Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 8<sup>th</sup> ultimo we have to acknowledge your letter to me dated 27<sup>th</sup> December last, which was received on the 14<sup>th</sup> ultimo having been posted in London the previous day: the Original of Despatch 426 with Enclosures was received on the 28<sup>th</sup> ult., as the S.V. "Theben" could not land it at Sandy Point but was obliged to carry it on with her Passengers to Valparaiso where she had to pass ten days in quarantine hence the very long delay. Your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 428 and 429 of 30<sup>th</sup> Jan<sup>o</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Feb<sup>o</sup> last arrived on the 14<sup>th</sup> instant <sup>with the Duplicates by same post</sup>, having been delayed somewhere: The Pacific S.V. "Valparaiso" having been unfortunately wrecked on the Coast of Spain on her passage out, her Mail from Valparaiso of 23 April is abandoned so that there will be uncertainty and may be delay with the Stanley Mail of 22 April, which she was to pick up at Sandy Point. The Pacific E<sup>o</sup> have given no notice that the subsequent Mails from Valparaiso leave that Port one week earlier than the dates given on their Time Table for 1887 sent you 14 Dec 86 in N<sup>o</sup>. 682.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 428, 2. We are all extremely glad to learn that you have recovered from your serious illness and trust you will now enjoy your usual good health.

3. Par 3. This letter was read by Mr. Wingfield of the Colonial Office and Capt<sup>r</sup>. Packe - The Directors approve of your proposal that a Magistrate should be appointed for Stanley if the Revenue can afford this expense and we shall doubtless be able to support the matter at the Colonial Office. We do not however think you ought to press for the appointment of a Tax Inspector as a Government Officer for it will be too expensive, there

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would be such a long delay in getting a man from New Zealand and then time would be lost in his learning how to work the country properly; according to your request I enquired at the New Zealand Government Office and was told the pay is £500 to 300 a year, we might obtain a fairly competent man a little under the lower rate upon a three or five years engagement with his expenses paid so Stanley which would be considerable, as even then it would be necessary to pass a Scab Act stronger than the Sheep Ordinance N° 3 of 1867 we consider a good plan would be to appoint a Sheep Farmer to carry it out, one to be chosen one year from the East Falklanders another year from the West Falklanders, his expenses to be reimbursed by the fines upon the defaulting Sheep Farmers and a rate upon the number of Sheep possessed by each Farmer, as a rate upon the acreage of Land held by each would not be fair some land being capable of stocking more Sheep than other land. Should it be found that the Sheep Farmers were averse to being chosen to carry out the Act it is suggested that Mr. Herbert Felton would undertake it for a moderate salary for 2 or 3 years, and is very suitable for such an office through his intimate knowledge of the country, the mode of sheep farming and his great activity.

With respect to Scab disease the entire gathering of the Sheep for the clipping and dipping is the main thing, if this is not most carefully done so that none are left behind there is the chance of those not collected becoming diseased and inoculating the animals which have returned clean from the dipping, it should therefore be imperative that every Shepherd collects the whole of his flock and should there be any rough ground or mountains to which they can escape and there is a difficulty in catching them, he should be instructed to shoot them burying the skin and carcase if there are any signs of disease or taking off

The skin if fit to be preserved with others. We are informed that the safest way of curing the Scab is two dippings of Lime & Sulphur (glad to find there is plenty of these goods if needed for use) and then a dip with Little's or Mr. Dougall's Dip, which restores the yoke to the Wool giving a coating to it and thus protecting the sheep in severe weather.

4. Par. 4, 5, 6. This most fortunate the 'Juniper' has cleared out the Coals in the 'Dog Bray' at such a good rate - respecting the deficiency of 63 tons upon four shipments of Steam Coals during the last four years, it is rather heavy but not much to wondered at considering the trouble & uncertainty of receiving and delivering Coals by weight. We are satisfied you have done well to again tender for Steam Coals for the Admiralty and trust your offer will be accepted, when as you observe your excellent recommendation to purchase the 'Gt. Britain' and her coals will prove a great success: the present Flormos G.W. 'Neko' is to take about 100 tons Coals also the extra G.W. 'Luxor' leaving Antwerp on 24<sup>th</sup> inst. at 20/- a ton to be paid for at once on receiving the Captain's receipt according to Mr. Staudé's correspondence enclosed the latter is not so touch at Sandy Point and it may be doubtful if the 'Neko' will, please notify to us the time consumed in loading these Coals as a guide should any Steamers apply: Messrs. James Burness &c. 138 Leadenhall G.W. have called to say that a small steamer bound to Panama might call during May, the price named was 5/- We send you a new Chart of Magellan Strait published by the Admiralty 26 Jan 87, N° 554, also Anchorages in Tierra del Fuego published 9 Dec 86 N° 559 - These will be delivered by Capt. Prehn of this Steamer and as the Flormos C. did not know of this issue we present him with a copy and also give a copy for Capt. Grunden of the 'Luxor', which you will please deliver to him.

5. Par 6. You have done well in purchasing from Smiley's property N. 26 Section of Land in Stanley and we are lucky it went at such a cheap rate - par 32 - we must inform Mr. Dixon that he must procure a conveyance from Capt. Wilson or his heirs, but ought be not meantime to give notice to the Government that he holds the Deeds and that they ought to call upon Dean to prove his title for possession.

6. Par 9, 29. The "Great Britain's" Inventory & Account of Goods passed into Store is certainly excellent, care shall be taken to do the best possible with all gear sent here but the large iron masts and spars will not sell here as such, but only as old scrap iron, so you had better retain them and any unusual large article for turning to account some time or other, would not the tall masts do for flagstaffs or signalling beacons if any fortifications are erected - the Steam Winch will certainly prove exceedingly useful. We regret you have not been able to get another - you put our sale of her Coals to the St. "Granville" in rather a strong light, we have no wish to support Mf's. Townsend and Spearing, quite the contrary, but as we know this charter must result in heavy loss to them, we availed of their offer to buy <sup>our</sup> Coals, which they could have got elsewhere at very little more than our price, as at that time we had such an enormous quantity on hand, the late rapid sales have of course altered the position but they were quite unexpected; we shall not now do anything with the Admiralty though we send Copy of our letter to them of 22<sup>nd</sup> ult. about their purchasing Hull Cargo, which was sent after mature consideration as there was no communication from the Admiralty upon the survey ordered by Capt. Kennedy on their behalf.

7. Par 11. I might answer the Co's. purchase to offer to purchase C. Williams' business & property provided he does not expect too much as Storekeeping seems to pay now and you may be able to devote more time to such matters if a certain arrangement is carried out, but will not Dean's Store be now better managed under Turner as George Dean we hear is coming home in the "Selimbris" - at all events the greatest caution must be

greatest caution must be used for the outlay on the 'Genesta' 'Gr Britain' and her Coals has made us very short of funds as our Produce sold so bad last year.

8. Paras 12 to 17. We are extremely sorry that there has been so much trouble with the 'Genesta' and her crew, Capt<sup>r</sup> Smith was appointed contrary to my wishes for commanding her at the Colony, I did my best to prevent the house being put into his Agreement and it is too bad that he does not do as much as he can & ought having such a good appointment - had we known as much as your last Despatch reported a Nova Scotian vessel would have been obtained but every one consulted recommended an English vessel in preference - we can hardly send out 100 tons Thinstedge and for you to put in a larger Cabin would be very expensive, if sent back for sale here the price to be obtained would probably be £500 less than we gave for her, would the loss of working her amount to this in a couple of years if so she might as well be returned if she can earn good freight home and you could do without a vessel until a Nova Scotian gets out, though even the building of her would be a great risk, the Directors depend on your mature consideration of the whole business and will rest assured that whatever decision you make is for the best, if you determine to part with her ought she not to be offered in Montevideo. Mr Barnes Masnokyer (18<sup>th</sup>) arrived, the Letter Book was ordered yesterday and we hope to get it tomorrow.

9. Paras 18 to 20 & 37. We are glad to hear you were able to get round to Darwin so comfortably to visit the 'Gleambris' and have arranged so well for supplying auttons when, it is good that so few car cases have been refused and that Walker Creek average weight is so high - the

Board could not exactly answer the points in your 'Selembria' Despatch, you have taken the right course in refusing the  $\frac{1}{2}$  pound tare per carcase as the price has been reduced so much, also stopping work on the Sunday : it is most fortunate the C° is able to compensate the want of Sheep from the West Falklanders, your Telegram Home N° 64 that you would supply 9,000 Sheep arrived 13<sup>th</sup> ult. and we have looked after finance accordingly. The Meat C° feared the next cargo would be short but have now determined to send back the 'Selembria' as soon as possible to keep faith with those Farmers who have supplied this voyage and if she arrives in good time we trust she will leave by the end of next month. Par 37. I was only able to arrange with the Meat C° according as the Board or any Directors meeting for the business decided, thus the reduction was proposed by degrees and was decided at 8/- quite suddenly and for several replies from the Meat C° we had really to wait a long time as their decisions seemed embarrassed, I feel assured however that we did quite right to retain this business for ourselves & the Colony by making the reduction we did.

10. Par 22. The best means shall be used to obtain a decision upon Ships articles for Schooners coasting at the Colony, we forward copy of Colonial Office Letter 7/11ch about shipping Masters in our vessels which gives the same opinion as the verbal one I obtained from the Shipping Master's Office.

11. Par 26. It is annoying that the 'Wasp's' Boiler is giving trouble again, we shall consult our Engineer about Line plates and if he advises them send some by 'Selembria' with Indent 57 and the Whiskey mentioned N° 429, b.

12. Par 38. We have not yet heard of the arrival of the 'Narda' at Havre with only 358 bales Wool, this is below the expected quantity so we are glad to hear the 'Selembria' will bring a large quantity of Produce, further supplies by the vessel chartered for the Nitrate will be most welcome being short of funds & having to prepare for the June Dividend. Insurance for our Clients is attended to.

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13. The late mysterious deaths after clipping and dipping, supposed to be Anthrax, may be caused mostly by overdriving the sheep becoming heated when erysipelas sets in, also being kept in paddocks already denuded of grass by former flocks - another reason is the cold weather affecting them after dipping as they take a long time to dry - these deaths will always occur in large flocks though the very great mortality in ours may be diminished by greater care being exercised on many points and the percentage from all causes ought never to exceed 6 to 8 per cent. Great numbers of Sheep are lost through falling into the little streams running from the mountains & peat bogs, these should be cleared out at the bottom or bed and the mud thrown up on the sides which would then harden and enable the sheep to jump over these streams, the grass would also be improved thereby - many Farmers pay their Shepherds £3 a mile for this work when they do it in their overtime. It is a good plan to sow Grass seed upon the paddocks near the Clipping Stations which gets trodden in by the Sheep & takes root after they have left, when it has grown up these seeds are blown about and improve the pasture in the neighbourhood.

14. Through fencing in Australia and New Zealand the Sheep Farmers there get 15% more profit as the sheep are kept quiet, they lamb better and the whole land is usable since the sheep do not require to be driven back from the outsides of their runs and a less number of Shepherds are needed; the Directors have decided therefore to put up more Fencing as soon as you can make arrangements for this work and will if possible ship a quantity of iron fencing by the 'Pembria' as we understand she wants freight and the Meat C° will doubtless accept a reduced freight if we ship extra cargo.

15. Par 3g. As it appears desirable to cultivate business with the West Falklanders we are prepared to assist in any arrangement made with Mr. W. Stickney,

but we are hardly able to state the commission or cash paid here for their account at your office, this you can easily decide upon knowing the probable amount of the account and their position.

16. Par 40. I am sorry there is not a more definite report on the Rams sent by 'Selentria' 16 Nov 86 so enable us to order the most approved breed for the 20 to be shipped by her next month, we shall now wait arrival of next Mail due 5<sup>th</sup> proximo.

17. Ch 429, 3. You had better arrange with Dicbie as well as you can, Mr. Flemings Memo to him on 21 Nov 85 is returned, though it says "Cooking utensils are supplied" this doubtless referred to utensils for the passage out only according to the rules of the Fiermos Steamers, no sensible man would understand that such articles are supplied on shore for an engagement as a Shepherd for 5 years - the passage of his wife by the 'Selentria' 16 Nov 86 must be paid by him.

18. Par 5. Mr. Langridge states that he asked you to collect some freight £. on some Rams going by 'Selentria', as he could not stop them being required for the good of the Colony and having undertaken to arrange with the Geneslas Crew now returning, which will require knowledge and careful management, we have not charged him any commission.

19. Enclosed is some correspondence with the Greenock Steamship Co. whose steamers running to the West Coast of South America hold out a prospect of calling at our Colony if we could give them a good amount of freight, at present we hardly see how anything can be done with them.

The Brig "Shepherdess" of 215 tons chartered by the Rev<sup>d</sup> Bridges for several months work at Tierra del Fuego & the Falklands sailed from Plymouth on the 19<sup>th</sup> ultimo. We send by Capt<sup>r</sup> Prehn of this steamer a new Chart of Magellan Strait N° 554, having presented a copy to him and one to Capt<sup>r</sup> Grunden of the 'Luxor' which he will leave with you, also a Chart of the Anchorages in Terra del Fuego N° 559.

The F. & P. Meat Co. have just sent a letter asking us to instruct you to provide as many sheep for their next voyage as you can, also freight home if the 'Selentria' is not filled up with mutton, and to get all other Farmers to do the same. We have purchased the

Falkland Islands Company have purchased the Norfolk Roadster Stallion "Young Gentleman" 4 years old, 15.1 high, dark bay color and shall ship him by the "Selenbria" next month, enclosed Sale Catalogue gives a few particulars of him, and the Live Stock Journal of 11<sup>th</sup> inst. says the price was cheap.

20. Dr. Anderson wrote us about some Books missing from a case of "Petos" 18 Sep 86 we wrote the Hornos C. making a claim, which they decline as you will see by copies of letters from Mr. Claude: we have made a payment for Dr. Anderson and have ordered Stationery for next shipment so you ought always to keep £100 or 150 of his Cash in hand. Some time since you stated that A. M. Call would like to leave out his Nephew G. Harting as he would pay his own passage, we therefore wrote him about the "Selenbria", by the correspondence enclosed he now proves to be a Cousin and will not go out except under an engagement so the matter is dropped for the present. Wm. Hobson's father complains that he has not written to him, please make him attend to this duty. W. & Mrs. Ware are passengers second class being servants for Mr. Holmested, they are told you will advise & assist them to get over to the West. We have received £504. 2. 8 from the Underwriters for the damage to the "Hornet" and her repairs at Montevideo. Mr. Phlers has paid £60. 14. 2 for his Bge "Ida", we wired the British Consul as already reported about the Bottomry Bond, he demurred to the entire insurance on this so we had to allow upon a portion the balance will be debited to the Islands.

21. We shall be interested to hear what you think of Mr. Rhodes Cobb's suggestion to you some few details since about a Camp Manager as your reply is due here 5 prox. If favorable, as it is important not to lose time, Mr. Ph. Wale could leave by the "Selenbria's" next voyage with an understanding that if you approve of the appointment he could be engaged for three years at a salary commencing at £150 for the first £170 second £200 third,

with the proviso that if you decide such an arrangement would not benefit the Company he could return by her receiving an honorarium of £30 or 50 with his passage out & home £40 paid by the Company.

22. We have not received the return for July 86 of Shepherds, their houses and number of their flocks at our three Stations, please send this, also acreage of Sheep runs for Land Tax as per Ordinance 16 of 1882 and number of Sheep upon each run.

Sir, Your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 434 P. 'Selembria' dated 24<sup>th</sup> February arrived on the 16<sup>th</sup> ult., she delivered all her cargo in good order. On the 2<sup>nd</sup> inst. we received Duplicate of N<sup>o</sup>. 433 with Triplicate of N<sup>o</sup>. 432 in Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 434, dated 31<sup>st</sup> March, Original of N<sup>o</sup>. 433, with Enclosures, dated 26<sup>th</sup> March arrived on 6<sup>th</sup> inst. - your letter of 30<sup>th</sup> March with thirteen letters arrived on the 5<sup>th</sup> inst., all these letters were posted that day.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 434, 2. The Directors have decided to leave the 'Gt Britain's' Coals entirely in your hands and have therefore withdrawn all offers made here and have requested the Admiralty to correspond with you direct, the Frosnos &c will not take any more until you make further arrangements, they and the Admiralty consider you are asking too high a price, we trust you will make good and speedy sales sending by each Mail details of the number of tons sold each Steamer. The 'Flock' 33 $\frac{1}{2}$  tons is chartered by Dean for Gilkeson House Coals from Goole and return if required.

3. Par<sup>4</sup>. The Board trusts you will make further careful notes respecting the loss by deaths of Sheep, we are glad that there are no reports of the mysterious disease breaking out again. Par<sup>8</sup>. This paragraph was sent to Messrs. Edenborough their report does not make any particular remark on this though they say that the North Arm Wool is excellent, that the Cheviot Wool becomes hairy and they prefer the Romney Marsh, the wool tax N<sup>o</sup>. 2 Apr 87 and Selembria 16 Apr 87 has

sold remarkably well and we trust the rise of price will continue to make up for the deficiency of last year - as you are now using Cooper's Dip and other Farmers require it we have shipped 70 cases. Par 10. The packing of the Wool must on no account be altered, the bales are well pressed and if the "broken" was put with the fleeces it would injure the value of them. Holmested & Blake's specification of Wool only to hand on 5<sup>th</sup> May this wool having been sold on 22<sup>nd</sup> April - the mark FB was not marked on the bales this ought to be done in future.

4. Par 11. We think you have done very well for the 'Selimbra', her Mutton is selling very well, we believe the meat C° will do well this trip though having too large a steamer it will be unfortunate if they cannot fill up this voyage, as you imply that we cannot afford many sheep for them and your telegram to them intimated it would be well to give them 1,000 bales as cargo, the Board have granted this as the autumnal prices of Wool are frequently better than the summer prices, we allowed the meat C° to telegraph on 24<sup>th</sup> ult. "your Directors approve 1,000 bales", and trust it reached you with the mail of 5<sup>th</sup> ult. so as to stop any arrangements with the 'Cosmos' C°, as it certainly is our duty to support the meat C° in every way. No one in authority goes out in her on behalf of the C°, Mr Muller the Stevedore attends to the clerical work.

Par 14. The grounding of the 'Selimbra' was most unfortunate, there is to be a claim on the Insurance so we have claimed the £25 for 'Gornet's' services according to your letter of 12<sup>th</sup> March received 16<sup>th</sup> ult., as the Brokers could not make any reduction for future freight.

5. Par 13. This was sent to Auning & Cobb, whose report of 5<sup>th</sup> inst. states that our Tallow is decidedly superior to Holmested & Blake's and that there is no difference in the quality of ours after N. 40 cask, we expected you would have reported how much was obtained from the Mutton sheep and we want a return of the Tallow resulting from 100 sheep or the whole number if more convenient so as to judge what each animal realizes, this Tallow has not fetched much as prices are very bad and unfortunately

likely to continue low though the Sheepskins have sold very well. Par 15. None of the Selentria's cargo was injured.

6. Par 16. The Board considers you have done the right thing in cancelling Capt<sup>n</sup>. Smith's Agreement and sending him back by the 'Selentria' - we have allowed him half pay for his passage to London.

7. N<sup>o</sup>. 433, 4. We send Bank of England receipt dated 21 Dec 85 for Murdoch Finlayson's £2 00 - also Donald Morrison's £100 dated 16 Sep 86 and £40 invested 18 Jan 87 - these were retained as they are no use to any one but are now sent for their satisfaction: we have purchased £130 Consols for Roderick Munro as P<sup>t</sup>. Bank Receipt herewith dated 3 May 87 and send Power of Attorney for him to sign and return, appointing me his Agent to receive the Dividends due 5<sup>th</sup> Jan<sup>t</sup>. & 5<sup>th</sup> July each year.

8. Pars 10, 11. We have already stated that it will be difficult to obtain good prices for the 'Gt. Britain's' Iron Spars & Rigging but every pains will be taken to dispose of all her gear &c coming in the 'C. C. Horneung' to the best advantage - her Chronometer is unsaleable except at a sacrifice, we might get £20 for it if any one wanted it, being an eight day clock is against it. In order to show how the 'Gt. Britain' is now sheathed with wood & zinc over that we have obtained from Lloyd's Register of Shipping a drawing of the half midship section with dimensions and all details which will be most useful in keeping her in proper order - we shall not send any red lead or oxide of iron until she is clear of Coals and you report what is necessary to be done.

9. Par 43. The Directors must leave it to you to decide if the Millinery Store in Stanley is to be given up, we could easily execute any order for such materials for Darwin Store, which will now be insured for £1,000 against fire.

Par 14. Our Wool is insured against total loss only, if we ordered it at all risks the premium would be much higher and we could then only claim for damage above 3 per cent;

which never occurs now that it is brought by Steamers, we send copy of Lelembria's Certificate for proper delivery of her cargo and an old Steamer Policy N<sup>o</sup>. 672 dated 27 May 86 to further explain the matter.

10. Par 26. As you report that Hobbs' Border Leicester Rams are preferred we ship 20 by this opportunity which completes the order given for improving and hardening our flocks: as the Stallion 'Young Gentleman' proved to be hardly suitable for us we have obtained the 'St. George' now shipped and trust he will get out safe and improve our breed of Horses: we learn that mares are always ready for the horse on the eighth or ninth day after <sup>having</sup> foaled, and that this does not interfere with their milk for the foal but saves a deal of time, pray instruct our people to take advantage of this fact.

11. Par 32. Before this arrived we had already paid the Italian remittances having received replies to our second and third letters, the postage on these was not paid and we actually had to pay the cost of the postal orders: the only remittance outstanding is the "Order given to R. Campbell £264" as per Statement upon Accounts N<sup>o</sup>. 196 dated 21 June 86 rec'd 6c Aug 86.

12. Par 36, N<sup>o</sup>. 434, 2, 5. The Cosmos C<sup>o</sup> have paid £132 for the 132 tons Coals delivered to their P.W. 'Gottmes' from the 'G. Britain' and I fear it is very doubtful if they will coal again, so shall until you actually order the Coal Bags we shall not send any and it will be difficult to get out such cheap rough goods at a moderate freight, for the Cosmos C<sup>o</sup> state that we must not expect any reductions or favors from them as their steamers are neglected for the 'Lelembria'.

13. The Registrar of Seamen told me that crews could be engaged at Stanley to ports and back without any time or period being mentioned, an official letter from the Office dated 18<sup>th</sup> ult. is enclosed.

14. Lloyd's sent us your Telegrams about vessels received 12<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> ult. - on the 16<sup>th</sup> ult. they telegraphed to you about the 'Cape Breton's' repairs sending it to the Post Office at Montevideo only, please inform us when this Telegram arrived for our future guidance. Enclosed is copy of letter to Humphreys on 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. complaining of his inattention to us, if he does not behave better we shall apply to Lloyd's agents.

15. As the Board consider

15. As the Board consider it necessary to erect Fences whenever opportunity offers they have ordered seven miles to be shipped from Fletton & Guillaume with one barb wire at the top, full drawing is sent a copy being kept here in case of any alterations being proposed, if no alterations are suggested this style will be continued when any more is ordered - Mr. Dennis recommended a lower fence with only four wires all to be barb-wires but we thought this would be dangerous in catching the sheep by their wool, we at all be glad of your opinion on this fence as it would be much cheaper. Please send tracing of Fence K Rolon's Cove to Salvador, also the fence at Yeguada for Mares and the position of houses at Egg Harbour, Centre and Bodie Creek. The four Photos of Goose Green Works were received from Mr. Wolf and are very interesting, the 'Gelentria' seems to lie a long way off, could you not send a good sized plan of Goose Green works and surrounding country <sup>free</sup> showing where she usually moors. Not many minutes since Capt. Packe told me the present shipment of Mutton does not sell well though being so dark colored through the absence of fat on the outside of the carcasses, he was always of opinion they would not be able to get proper Mutton early in the year as the Sheep have not had time to fatten up during the commencement of your summer, the present will be a test shipment upon this point.

16. We received on 21<sup>st</sup> ult. a Collie Bitch from the Isle of Harris for Evan Morrison and have shipped her by this opportunity - I ought to have told you that in "St. George" is insured for £100.

17. The Directors have given up the idea of appointing Mr. Weale as Camp Manager.

18. We are very glad to hear that the Galvanic is doing so much good to your leg and trust the improve-

-ment will be permanent as it must be very annoying  
to you not to be able to get about quickly.

19. We shall of course write on the 16<sup>th</sup>. instant  
by the S. W. 'Denderah' which conveys 20 cases Butter  
Camel brand, also 100 boxes Cigars and 6 barrels dried green  
Peas from Vorwerk of Hamburg.

Enclosing Duplicate and Copies of all Enclosures of our last Despatch on 10<sup>th</sup> inst. and copies of my letters to you dated 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> inst., all by the S.V. 'Glembria' which sailed from Cardiff yesterday morning at 10 am, we now acknowledge your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 635, dated 4<sup>th</sup> ult., which arrived this morning with enclosures all in order.

2. My surmise about Flouse Coals on the 12<sup>th</sup> being correct we shall wait arrival of the 'C. C. Morning' and endeavour to arrange a Charter out, with option of return, she going to one of the Eastern Coal ports for Flouse Coal and then up to Montrose for Miller's Timber if we can make terms with them to cover this extra cost for going so far North, which however we might well bear for the superior timber & the cleanliness in shipping it - you have not mentioned the quantity of lime & cement, and your suggestion to put the rough goods ordered by Indent 59 cannot be carried out as we took extra pains to ship them by the 'Glembria', however your next Despatch due here 31<sup>st</sup> inst. may order some rough Stores.

3. With respect to the 'Genesta' the Board has by Despatch 685, 8. partially given you permission to part with her if to the C.C. advantage, and as you justly observe the first logs would probably be the least we must really leave it in your hands, should it therefore be found that she can be sold without very heavy loss and that a Nova Scotia vessel ought to be built for us, we shall require full detailed particulars of such a craft suitable for us so that the same may be ordered without delay, & therefore send copy of some rough memos jotted down when we were considering this matter with Mr. Rudolf, of Crowe Rudolf &c. the owners of the 'Glembria', which may guide you as to these needed particulars - should the Board of the 16<sup>th</sup> inst. decide differently we could telegraph you on 10<sup>th</sup> prox. to catch this steamer at M. Vido as doubtless the Frosos S.V. will now call there. Should we wire the word "changeable" will denote that the 'C. C. Morning' is chartered and two words date of June or July the time she would leave.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 31<sup>st</sup> May we acknowledge your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 436 of 18<sup>th</sup> April received on 3<sup>rd</sup> ult., N<sup>o</sup>. 437 and 438, of 11<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> May received on 25<sup>th</sup> ult., and your letter & memo of 24<sup>th</sup> May received on 29<sup>th</sup> ult., the latter enclosing Duplicate Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 437 and 438.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 436, 2. The Produce ex 'Tomes' 18 Nov last has all been sold under the right marks and we trust the Account Sales are satisfactory.

3. Par 5. The Directors are glad to hear that Mr. Costello our Engineer is so attentive and carries out his duties well, they do not however consider it would be wise to voluntarily increase his Wages as he has good pay, is content and receives a yearly rise.

4. Par 6, 8. As you are boiling down Sheep for Tallow we presume they were too old for the Meat C: or that you had no land to keep them on until the next arrival of the 'Clemencia', this is unfortunate for the Meat C: as we fear she will not get so many as they anticipated for the present voyage. We are sorry to hear that your leg has not yet quite recovered but trust you were able to get over the Camp Inspection without much difficulty. It is satisfactory to learn that the intelligence we sent about the New Zealand Scab Inspector will prove useful, we think you are right to give up the idea at present to press for the appointment of an Inspector for our Sheep being clean the C:

ought not to be liable for any expense of such an Official, should Mr. Bonner not keep his flocks clean we trust you will put in force the Colonial Scab Ordinance.

5. Par 9. We are glad to hear that the Coals ex 'Great Britain' are now selling, the Cosmos C° reserve the right of objecting to expenses on these Coals supplied to their Steamers but as you have the entire management of this business with respect to them you can make your own terms in future.

6. Par 10. Mr. Dixon informs us that Capt. Wilson will not transfer the Land to him, he therefore writes to the Colonial Office & wishes the Deeds returned.

7. Par 17. Your full explanation upon the deaths among the Sheep makes the disease more mysterious than ever, we believe with you that perhaps a remedy might be found if a properly qualified Veterinary Surgeon visited the Colony and remained sufficiently long for a thorough inspection, but where to find such a man? and the heavy expense could only be undertaken on the whole Sheep Farmers binding themselves to pay their full shares.

8. Par 22 and N° 637. The Directors are satisfied with the present arrangement for Camp work as detailed in these Despatches and they are glad to find that you have the matter so well in hand and that the Overseers at the C°'s Three Stations do their work so thoroughly, they consider notwithstanding your good opinion of all employed that your personal inspection of the Farm work would result in an improvement and they approve of your carrying out our suggestion for more Fencing in Lafonia, having shipped 7 miles by the 'Telembría' of 10 May 87 we shall order double this quantity for her next voyage out, which ought to leave at the end of next October: it is rather singular

that at the last Board one of our Directors moved that certain proposals as to Camp management and general Farming operations at the Colony should be submitted for your consideration and report, as you have now touched upon many of the points he now desires that only his rough notes may be sent for your consideration.

9. Par 2. We have never heard the expense of the proposed Boarding House at Darwin to enable the children of Shepherds at outlying stations to attend the School there, if there is a vacant house there and the parents would pay a portion of the expense the Board would consent to a moderate outlay by the C.

10. N<sup>o</sup>. 438, 1. We have already sent Cash Acc<sup>t</sup> of the 'Hornet's' Insurance receipts for her damage and now forward Average Statement to explain everything fully.

11. Par 2. The receipt and Account Sales of Provisions ex S.V. 'Doris' 17 Jan 87 have been rendered, if you find that a bale of Sheepskins has been transferred from one mark to another it must be rectified at Stanley.

12. Par 3. James Rae and Alex<sup>r</sup> Walker have been here to receive their Cash, they will return by the Rosario S.V. 'Doris' on 10 Sept<sup>r</sup> next - we have written the former to look out for a qualified Ditcher to go with them.

13. Par 5. It is most unpleasant to hear of the utter failure of the 'Wasp', the next Board will decide what course to pursue, if a new Steam Launch is to be provided I should imagine they would send a perfect one by the 'Clemencia' as alterations & additions at Stanley are expensive.

14. Par 6. I wrote you on 2<sup>nd</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> about the 'Bidston Hill' and 'Aphrodite', Mess<sup>r</sup> W. Price &c: have not informed us of any steps taken, I told Lloyd's privately of the

opportunity of telegraphing on 9<sup>th</sup> ult. - it is a pity these vessels are not in our hands though several of the Directors observed, on reading about the sales you have made for them, that probably we should make as much profit, since former vessels worked by us did not much increase the Gtore profit - all the Photos mentioned have been received and are much appreciated.

15. Par 13. The 'Setembria' has always been considered by us here as large for the Mear Co's work at our Colony, but I fear they could not use her for other ports and still carry out their duties to the Falklands, despite competition and heavy expenses they are doing their best and have asked if we will continue to sell carcases at the reduced price of £1- (which we agreed for two voyages only) as they are preparing for a fourth voyage out, the Directors have assented to this and trust you will counsel other Sheep Farmers to do the same, but you are on no account to reduce our stock to supply them for though Tallow is low Wool is likely to continue at the risen price, and as we support them with cargo out and home, and an especial large one for the third voyage home as you have not shipped by the Setos of 22 May last, they must do their best if not so much Mutton as expected.

16. The Annual General Meeting was held on 20<sup>th</sup> ult., a Dividend of 15 per cent was declared and the usual Resolution passed for thanks to yourself other Officers and all employed by the Co, which we beg you will transmit to them: The Buildings were not depreciated so much as usual the Auditors considering their present Book value as quite low enough and it is decided that you are to send a List of our whole Buildings and present estimated fair value for next Balance Sheet distinguishing those which ought to be depreciated at 5% instead of the usual 10%.

17. Mr. G. J. Symons sent us

17. Mr. G. J. Symons sent us on 16<sup>th</sup> ult. your letter to him of 19<sup>th</sup> Apr. last, with his reply to you now enclosed, asking us to receive from Negretti & Zambra a case of Thermometers, this has been sent off by present Steamer and the account is paid. We send Copy of Colonial Office letter 5<sup>th</sup> inst. with Copy of Gov<sup>r</sup>. Kerr's Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 60, dated 19<sup>th</sup> May last, about the duties of Shipping Masters with reference to the Masters of Merchant Vessels when seamen are being engaged.

18. The Directors received by the last Mail a letter from the Rev<sup>r</sup>. W<sup>m</sup>. H. Phillips thanking the C<sup>o</sup>. for the attentions to himself and the people under his religious charge during the first five years of his ministry and expressing hope that a second period of like duration may be granted, this is very satisfactory, but he brings to notice that his house requires repairs to the roof, windows &c and that a new Kitchen Range is needed, the Board wish therefore that such necessary matters should be attended to: he also states that the two horses allowed him are too old for the long journeys but would answer for the short ones if two young horses were provided for long distances, this is reasonable so we wish you to see this carried out.

19. The 'C. C. Hornung' arrived 9<sup>th</sup> ult. with all cargo in order as per copy of Manifest herewith the Frides & Sheepskins have been sold, the former only yesterday, but it is very difficult to dispose of the sundry shipping articles as there is so little business for sailing vessels - the Beef & Pork is not in good order and we were told the brand shows it to be bad poor stuff: as she would not accept a fair freight out we have chartered the Norwegian Barquentine 'Fri' Capt<sup>r</sup>. Hansen, 264 tons, as per enclosed Charterparty dated 24<sup>th</sup> ult., she is due now at Grimsby to load 150 tons flour

Coal and we shall send down to her from London and other places the balance of Indents 58 & 59 and if possible whole of Nos 60 & 61 and 62, she will then go on to Montrose to load the Timber ordered and fill up with Deals, Mess<sup>r</sup>s Millar are also to supply as many of the Spars you require as they can and then we must endeavour to procure the balance at Hamburg for the 'Ibis' of 15 Sep next. This present Steamer carries a small cargo of Stores which you wanted by first opportunity that were possible to be got ready.

20. Mess<sup>r</sup>. James Burnes Sons 138 Leadenhall Street having asked if we could supply two small French Steamers with 30 to 40 tons Coals each we have agreed at 4/- p. ton, allowing 1/- per ton to them, and I have signed two letters of introduction in French dated 29 ult. as per copies enclosed, they are called Cistern Boats built at Farrow and are expected to leave there about the 15<sup>th</sup> inst. - payment by Bills on Mess<sup>r</sup> Baratond Letellier &c to Rue de Rome, Paris, at 30 days sight. There was an enquiry on the 5<sup>th</sup> inst. to ask if we knew of the Garnock 674 tons bound to Vancouver's Island having put into Stanley, we replied in the negative.

21. We have the pleasure of stating that the Falkland Islands Meat Co. have settled everything for the last shipment home, but Mr. Langridge says it is doubtful whether the 'Téméraire' can start until the middle of November upon her fourth voyage out and even this may be delayed, as Mr. Wolf told me yesterday that she ought not to arrive at Stanley until the end of January, as during that month all hands are engaged shearing & the sheep are not in good condition until February, this delay will however make her late for sale of mutton next Spring, also our Fencing out will be delayed. Notwithstanding what I have said in Par 13 the Board will require full specific details for Steam Launch to guide them in contracting with a first rate Firm for a boat guaranteed at a certain speed and properly fitted throughout, so that these details should come as soon

as possible if we are to avail of the 'Selembria'.

'Ramses' on 9<sup>th</sup> inst. were omitted, they are now combined with remarks on present vessel.

4. We enclose General Invoice through unfinis<sup>h</sup>, 23 Detailed Invoices, Coal Bill of Lading, Stores B&L shipped at Grimsby and have requested Messrs. Millar to send their Invoice, Bill of Lading and Timber Manifest direct - our Manifest is enclosed also Letter to Dr. Dale about some Private Effects shipped for him - also Parcel being a pipe for Capt. M. Lanchan from Capt. Smith.

Enclosing Duplicate of a formal letter sent on 8<sup>th</sup> ult. during my absence we have to acknowledge the following received from you, Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 439 on 8<sup>th</sup> ult. 440 Duplicate on 23<sup>rd</sup> ult., Original on 30<sup>th</sup> ult., N<sup>o</sup>. 441 on 23<sup>rd</sup> ult., N<sup>o</sup>. 442 on 30<sup>th</sup> ult., Mr. Langdon's Letter of 13<sup>th</sup> July on 24<sup>th</sup> ult. and your letter of 15<sup>th</sup> July on 30<sup>th</sup> ult..

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 439, 2406. The Board is much obliged

for the long description about the Profit and Sales at the Store, which is explained well and they feel satisfied that at present you are doing all you can and they must trust to you to make any improvement that is possible.

3. Par 9. We are grieved that there are so many

difficulties to be overcome by the F. & P. Meat C<sup>o</sup>, we have long held the opinion that they are a necessity for the progress of our Colony in which you quite coincide and have therefore assisted them in every way, they have lately asked us to enter into another arrangement whereby this C<sup>o</sup> receives payment for their sheep from the sale here and the Meat C<sup>o</sup>'s management, as the Directors declined to speculate in this manner we offered to reduce the price to 6/6<sup>0</sup> a carcase of 75 lbs for the present voyage and two subsequent shipments, we supplying 8,000 Sheep yearly in two consignments as you can arrange the quantities, they demur to this adhering to the second paragraph of their 13 Augt. letter, we cannot however alter & doublets they will eventually agree though they are working all the other Sheep Farmers to their proposal and wish our offer of the 6/6 reduction not to be divulged: the whole correspondence is enclosed. On the 6<sup>th</sup> inst. Telegram Home N<sup>o</sup>. 66 arrived "Slush supencia sheep", we have shipped 3500 Sheep, we have therefore applied for a Banker's Guarantee, the private arrangement between us - their Telegram states the 'Gelamoria' was to

sail 25<sup>th</sup>. ult. but it is uncertain whether Darwin or Stanley is meant.

4. Par 10, 15, 20. Your remarks on Fencing are noted. The Board is almost sure to order some to be sent by the 'Glenbriar' if she returns next November, I ought to have said in former paragraph that the Meat C° are endeavouring to obtain a smaller steamer this would enable them to manage their business more economically.

5. Par 19. It is right that you have drawn our attention to the large amount of Wages due to the Camp Men and should a Savings or Post Office Bank be established in the Colony, we must be prepared to pay off a great number the difficulty will be to find the Cash all our available surplus being constantly sent out in Stores, I am surprised so few avail of Bank of England investments here which cost them no trouble and bring in 3 per cent, if the Government establish a Savings Bank at 2½% would it answer for us to allow 2% as they would <sup>have</sup> no trouble of Deposit Books?

6. Par 20. I saw Prof. Robertson of R. Veterinary College to give him your opinion that Anthrax was the cause of the disease amongst the Sheep, this coincides with his former expressed opinion, which he states could be confirmed by examining the blood of the spleen in which would be found small germs which distribute the disease and he strongly advises that all bodies should be buried & covered with lime & water, <sup>do</sup> this thoroughly is of course impossible upon our extent of land as the Falklands still the utmost care and caution must be used, the Professor stated that this disease could pass on to human beings if they got any of the blood upon wounds in their hands, Mr. Cameron does not believe <sup>this</sup> as one of his Shepherds skinned & cut up carcasses with a cut finger for many days - it will still be necessary to be very cautious, you might experiment by inoculating mice, rats are not so good for this purpose and it would be of great service if two or three diseased carcasses could be refrigerated and sent here by next steamer.

7. Par 42, 44. We cannot report a decision upon the insurance of Darwin Harbour Store as the National Manager

is absent for his holidays, this & the Millinery Store will be insured as soon as possible.

8. N<sup>o</sup>. 440, 3. Your proposal to remunerate the Fosnos C° with our Produce if they take Coals ex 'Gt Britain' is good and we support same as the Fosnos wanted to arrange this business at 25/- per ton for the Coals against your price 30/- which you will see by the long correspondence sent herewith, Mr. Stande has not closed the matter but under all circumstances the whole matter will be left to you.

According to your wish I commenced a correspondence with the Greenock Steamship C° but cannot arrange anything as they have scarcely commenced their service to the West Coast and thus cannot give any dates when their Steamers could call at Stanley - you will see by the correspondence that we offered 40/- to 50/- p. ton weight or measurement according to class of goods for freight out, for home Wool at 4/- p. ton meas., Tallow 45/- p. ton weight, Sheepskins 82/- p. ton weight and shall stick to these rates, except special for 'Selembria' for Lime, rough Timber & Iron or Spars. We declined the Greenock C° offer for Stores & Produce at Liverpool, now they propose the Tilbury Docks which will cause a small extra charge to be informed us by the East & West India Dock C°. The 1,500 Bags for having Coals in readiness must be sent by the 1st of Nov or the 'Selembria' if she starts before that time, unfortunately the Heat C° not knowing when she will be here cannot fix a date and then worst of all is the chance of their giving up this voyage or even the whole business.

9. Part 4. You will perceive that I took the pains immediately on arrival of the Duplicate to write the same day to M<sup>r</sup>. Lewis Anderson & Son Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, about their building a Schooner for us and embodied your remarks with my own made on 18 Aug 86 in a statement copy of which is sent with the letter, and trust that such a full explanation will enable them to return such a reply and estimate as will enable the Board to order this vessel to be built at once without the delay of a reference to you, this can hardly be done at the next Meeting on 19<sup>th</sup> so must be decided next month, though I shall press the matter forward as much as possible.

10. Par 7. Your request to be relieved of your guarantee for Mr. Elbury's expenses to Stanley to join her husband must wait for a decision at the next Board meeting.

11. Par 8. On renewing the 'Hornet's' Policy on 14<sup>th</sup> July last we could not insure more than £650 and even for that we had to pay a premium of fourteen guineas per cent in consequence of the late heavy claim on the Underwriters for her damage and expenses at Montevideo, and nothing can be allowed for lying up in harbour a month at a time.

12. No 444, 4. As Myles the Blacksmith is leaving our service we have engaged George Chaplin to fill his place at Nine Pounds (£9) per calendar month from date of arrival at Stanley, passage money for himself and family to be advanced and repaid by monthly instalments of £1 (four pounds) after first month's pay, he goes by this Steamer with his wife, two young daughters and an infant - as his Furniture could not go by Steamer we have undertaken to convey it by first sailing vessel or S.W. 'Glembria', and as no charge was named it by the latter we shall have to make the best arrangements possible and pay ourselves, which will be but fair having engaged a first rate man at moderate wages.

13. Par 5. Capt. Cotter of the 'Star of Scotia' arrived at Liverpool from the 'Marta' at Montevideo by the S.S. 'Chancery' he has not called here but the Owners have met the Bill £6. 14. 6 by a Cheque, the Times of the 6<sup>th</sup> inst. contains an account of the wreck and we send the Daily Chronicle of the 5<sup>th</sup> inst. having a much longer account of the same.

14. The 'Angara' arrived 11<sup>th</sup> ult. with 51 bales Sheepskins, the S.S. 'Granville' on the 16<sup>th</sup> ult. with 235 bales Wool, 4 bales Sheepskins, 5 casks Tallow, 84 Hides - the Wool is for sale this day, Mr. Bonner has requested a Cheque when we receive the proceeds. The 'Dennis Brundrit' sailed for Stanley on 3<sup>rd</sup> ult., Mr. Dean has chartered the Barge 'Gem' 459 tons to take out Houses &c for erection at Stanley she is to sail the middle or end of next week we believe.

15. We are sorry the accounts of the 'C. C. Horning' cannot be sent as the sundries are not all sold, the most unfortunate thing is that the prices have been wretchedly low through the depreciation of shipping restricting the demand for secondhand sails, chains & fittings of all sorts. Mr. Trout cannot take back at the

cannot take back at the original price the Mule Harnesses as there is no sale here for it, if the dimensions of the collars and harnesses are not right and you will send the proper sizes the alterations shall be made without expense so that they may be returned fit for service.

16. Dr. Hamilton wrote me on 15<sup>th</sup> July that he had not received the three Catheters brought home by Mr. Arthur Barkly, I am surprised they have not been sent in one of the Despatches as ordered and now forward them with letter to Dr. Hamilton expressing my regret at the neglect - please deliver them at once.

17. It was only the other day I learned that there was a second Blue Book published last year with a Report from Lieut. Gov. Barkly upon our Colony, we have therefore sent you a Copy, as well as Report of the Royal Commission for the Colonial and Indian Exhibition of 1886, together with a Copy of this last for Darwin Library.

18. We have engaged David Goodwin, as a Ditcher and Drainer upon the usual Shepherd's Wages and trust his work will improve our land and lead our Shepherds to do something in this line: he has been selected by James Rae who has had good characters about him, he goes by this Steamer - James Rae and Alexander Walker return on their own account as they state you promised to engage them on arrival. Mr. Langdon's Son is also a Passenger we having at request of his Uncle Mr. Glover advanced his passage money second class, as well as the quarterly payment £8 for him due 1<sup>st</sup> prox: this being the last payment.

19. Having issued another Mail Table on the 1<sup>st</sup> instant we send some copies for yourself and our own people in Stanley and the Camps, also a couple from the Post Office for your Office, you will perceive that the latter enter the

October Mail on the 4<sup>th</sup> whilst ours is the 18<sup>th</sup>, when I took our Proof to Mr. Rea at the General Post Office to give them the dates for their issue I pointed out to him that that Mail arrived and left Pinta Arenas on the same day but that we as a matter of precaution should write on the 4<sup>th</sup> Oct<sup>r</sup> since receiving our Table he writes that they considered it safer to give the earlier date.

20. Since the foregoing about the Coals ex Gt. Britain to the S<sup>r</sup>. Luxor on 12<sup>th</sup> July last Mr. Staudé has called to say that M<sup>s</sup> Dorwerke of Valparaiso could not have advised Capt<sup>r</sup>. Grunden to call at Stanley for Coals at 30/- a ton as the Luxor did not call at Valparaiso having come direct from Central America to Coronel and if you can produce direct evidence that this was done or that Capt<sup>r</sup>. Grunden knew of the withdrawal of the rate at 20/- per ton the Cosmos would be liable for increased price of 30/- - the fact of Capt<sup>r</sup>. Grunden presenting our letter of 7<sup>th</sup> Feb<sup>r</sup> to you wherein the price is stated to be 20/- shows that he considered this to be the price. Mr. Staudé considers that he has made us a good offer on<sup>31<sup>st</sup> ult.</sup> for the entire quantity of the Gt. Britain's Coals at 25/- within 18 months or at the rate of 200 tons to each of their steamers calling because it ought to be our aim to get rid of them as quickly as possible considering the time since they were shipped at Swansea, when I observed that you might be under offer to the Admiralty<sup>that such requirements up to 200 or even 300 tons would not alter his proposal - as Coals can now be obtained at Montevideo at 35/- with quick despatch it would never answer to give 30/- at Stanley with two or three days delay and extra expenses for labour to the crew and shore men to get even that speed.</sup> Mr. Staudé further pointed out that the terms of the Mail Contract with the Government they were to provide a bulk in Stanley Harbour which could be used for coaling purposes or storing cargoes but that the Cosmos C<sup>r</sup> had not instituted this so as not to interfere with the F. & F. C<sup>r</sup>'s bulkes, this shows their desire to be on amicable terms with us so that some reciprocity is due to them.

21. We learn from the National Fire Insurance C<sup>r</sup>.

that the rate fixed on the Darwin Store is One Guinea P.C.  
£1000 being insured to 11<sup>th</sup> May 68, they suggest separate  
amounts being placed upon Grocery stock & Millinery stock.

22. As it would be convenient to know how our  
Wool will be shipped <sup>next</sup> year we have entered the word  
"Forward" to be wired if opportunity offers and desiring  
that you have accepted the Flosmos offer of 35<sup>d</sup>. ult. for the  
whole of the Gr: Britain's Coals at 25<sup>d</sup>., this would arrive 2<sup>nd</sup>  
pro<sup>r</sup>: or if you delayed until the next Mail to decide it  
would arrive 2<sup>nd</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup>, then we should know that our  
Wool will come by the Flosmos Steamers.

Since above Mr. Staudt has called to say that through  
the "P. bis" could take 200 tons Coals at Montevideo he has  
ordered her to do this at Stanley in anticipation that  
you will be able to arrange with Mr. Schlotfeldt to accept  
the above offer, in which case these Coals are to be included,  
should you not be able then these 200 tons are to be at  
30<sup>d</sup> or any reduction you can afford to compensate them  
for the extra delay at Stanley. Mr. Staudt says that  
our extra requirements up to 300 tons mentioned at  
Par 20 must only be for the Admiralty not for Steamers  
in opposition to his C<sup>r</sup>, this is but fair.

Vincent on 13<sup>th</sup> and is expected here on 24<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>. - They are going to engage the smaller 'G. Metapedia' which they talk of sending next Jan<sup>r</sup>. or Feb<sup>r</sup>. which will be a better time for getting Sheep in proper condition, we shall therefore be deprived of a vessel shortly for rough Stores and fencing and may have to combine with others in chartering a sailing ship as Dean and Capt<sup>r</sup>. Packe have cargo to send - we learn now from Bindley that the full quantity of Wool Bagging was not sent there being a bale still on hand, also Bouners 1,500 yds has to be shipped. The Invoice for the 2 doz Pearson's Nautical Almanacks<sup>for nearey year</sup> packed up with this will be included in the next general invoice. George Chaplin, Blacksmith P. O. bis' 10<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>. informed me that he had not left any Furniture in Scotland as we were told he had.

3. By Edenborough's priced Wool Catalogue of 10<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>. herewith you will perceive Bouner's Wool ex 'Granville' sold at fair rates though we expected rather higher prices, he writes he is satisfied. Hoare's priced Catalogue of Wool Sale on 16<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>. shows much about the same prices though a good quantity was not sold.

Enclosing Duplicate of our last on the 19<sup>th</sup> ult. by the 'Gem' we acknowledge your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 443 and 444 in duplicate & N<sup>o</sup>. 445 received on 26<sup>th</sup> ult. by the S.V. 'Gleamoria' - the Originals of N<sup>o</sup>. 443 & 444 being delivered yesterday by Mail Steamer from Montevideo.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 443, 3. We are glad to hear our Stallion 'St George' arrived in such good order and is so approved, we do not think he has been broken in for riding.

3. Par 6, 7. It is most unfortunate for the Meat C° that the West Falklanders have not carried out their arrangements, you justly observe that the winter is so very bad for the Sheep and as the 'Metapedia' is now to arrive for work in your Summer and Autumn the Meat C° have doubtless been guided by your good advice though we understand they still wish to make two voyages in the year.

4. N<sup>o</sup>. 694, 2. We regret to hear that the Captain of the 'Ramses' neglected to deliver the Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 690 by his vessel immediately on arrival, you asked us some time since to send our Despatches by the direct Steamers in charge of the Captains to avoid delay at the Post Office.

5. N<sup>o</sup>. 445, 5. With respect to the 'Luxor's' Coals at 3<sup>0</sup>/- a ton we await your further evidence about Capt N<sup>o</sup>. Grunden being really instructed by Vorwerk and knew that our offer of 2<sup>0</sup>/- a ton was withdrawn as per Par 20 of N<sup>o</sup>. 692. You will find by a statement sent herewith that we have been obliged to compromise our claim on the Flotemos C° for non-delivery of Hydraulic Ram per Letos 18 Sep 86 by receiving £ 20 in cash as they were put to expenses and

delay in taking the Gt Britain's Coals for their Steamers.

**6. Par 8.** I believe the Directors would give permission for the establishment of a Boarding House for Shepherd's children coming to Darwin for education if they had more particulars of the same, do you imply that for £300 a proper house could be built and kept up for a year and what arrangement ought to be made for relays of children coming in, how many at a time &c. As to the balances of Wages on hand the last Board decided that if the Government are not able to start a Savings Bank we are prepared to allow 2½ per cent upon all sums above £50, this would surely be appreciated and induce old hands to remain.

**7. Par 9.** As regards the Store business the last Board considered your proposal of purchasing Williams' business and thought that if there is some security against another man starting it might answer to purchase his stock but they would not give any good will as he would doubtless put a full value upon all his Stores. It was also decided that your guarantee for Mr. Elsbury's expenses is to be cancelled, we ought therefore to have a letter of thanks from her for our paying so much for getting her out.

**8. Par 14, 15.** This very natural that a vessel once at Stanley should offer to return to England at a lower rate than if making a round charter here, but we believe you will find that the 'Fris' cargo is got out cheaply, and with respect to the fine goods in her it was confidently expected when they were stripped that she would arrive before the next Mail Steamer - as you now wish everything to be sent by Steamer even to the bulky fencing we must give up the idea of combining with others for a <sup>having 120 tons exclusive of stores</sup> refit out, and shall endeavour to execute Indents 64, 65, 66 and continuation of 65 received yesterday by the G.W. Denderah (substituted for Totnes) on 19<sup>th</sup> prox: including 57 tons Fencing though I should have preferred sending this latter by the Metajedia - the Denderah may not call at Montevideo as there is a chance of sickness there.

**9. Par 17.** We cannot do anything about E. Morrison's dog sent by the Columbia, we had no knowledge of its coming

and were surprised it should be sent but being here were bound to send it on by first opportunity.

10. Part 1. We have deposited £300 for W. McMillan in the Bank of Scotland who require his signature, the rate of interest is not fixed but fluctuates with the Bank rate, is it to be drawn every quarter and remitted to him or is it to be added to the principal?

11. Enclosed is a notice of the Greenock Steamships Co. about their 'Gulf of Guay' sailing from Liverpool on 20<sup>th</sup> inst. for the West Coast of South America - there will be no extra expense for cargoes of these steamers to & from the Tilbury Docks but I have not much faith in their being able to do anything for us.

12. The Sheepskins ex Angara and Granville sold well but complaints are made of inferior flaying the pelt being cut with a knife if more care were taken to prevent this they would realize 3/- to 5/- per dozen more. The 'Gelendria' arrived in South West India Dock late on 24<sup>th</sup> inst. - her Wool was sold yesterday unfortunately at rather lower prices than have been lately ruling and than we expected : she is chartered for Australia sailing on 2<sup>nd</sup> prox: as per card enclosed, Mr. Crow Jnr. and Capt: Fowler called on 28<sup>th</sup> ult: about her taking 700 tons St. Britain's Coals on her passage home they considered 3/- high in view of the week's delay in getting them on board, so no arrangement could be made.

13. We find the Millinery Store is insured for £800 in the running policy for £2800 so we need not carry out your wish to insure separate at £1000 - we send copy of this renewed policy 18<sup>th</sup> inst to show the details and copy of a list from the National Fire Office giving particulars of all our insurances.

14. Your two letters some of 25<sup>th</sup> August arrived 26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> ult: I am very much obliged for your Photo which is remarkably good and shows the Falklands agree with you, Mr. Boulcher would esteem a copy for himself and respect the other Directors when seeing it will express the same request.

The Board of yesterday have further considered your late Despatches enables me to continue the answer to them, sent a fortnight since to be on the safe side, as this Steamer arrives at Sandy Point on the same day that the Kosmos Boat calls there before going to Stanley.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 443, 7, 9 N<sup>o</sup>. 445, 10, 18. Re: noting to the F. P. Meat C<sup>o</sup>: what you say about not shipping during your winter, and thus that they ought to make only one voyage for the year, but the difficulty is that they must charter a vessel by the year for themselves, and have not to the present been able to employ her at any other Port; we fear that there will be but little profit for them even at our reduced price of 6/- a carcass of 75 lbs which we agreed to continue for two more shipments at 8,000 sheep yearly. As you say we must not bind ourselves to more than 6,000, we shall tell them this, and arrange that rejections are to be made when the animals are alive, also that the reduced price cannot hold good if they expect us to ship at a season when sheep are in poor condition. The S<sup>r</sup>. Metapedia' being now in China it is uncertain when she can be able to start; at present they anticipate the end of February or even the middle of March, this would make her at work at the best time of the year for us, so we must be content for the present and make the best arrangements possible.

3. N<sup>o</sup>. 445, 2. With respect to Mr. Costello our Engineer at Goose Green the Directors leave the matter in your hands if you consider it necessary to raise his Wages to induce him to remain in our service, as we are sure he is a very good man for the situation, but I am so point

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out that he does not have so many duties to perform, as the sheep are used for mutton instead of being boiled down.

4. Par 8. The Directors are willing to expend £300 for a Boarding House for children at Darwin if such an establishment can be arranged to be selfsupporting.

5. Par 23. As your time for furlough is approaching the Directors will be pleased to see you, if you can arrange matters properly for your absence, but they trust that you will not leave until there is a certainty that your duties can be fully carried out.

6. The 'Glembria' has only delivered 127 casks Tallow through the P&L states 130, we are assured this was the whole quantity shipped - she did not have so many carcasses as your Telegram Home N<sup>o</sup>. 66 reported so we had to return the meat &c. some cash on her arrival. Mr. Dean has purchased the Barquentine 'Polly Whittaker' 174 tons for Island service, as the P.W. 'Ranee' is to be sold; she will leave Liverpool end of this month, we propose shipping the rough stores by her - The 'Totnes' is now the Steamer for 19<sup>th</sup> pros<sup>c</sup>: instead of the 'Denderah' as per last Despatch Par 8; we shall not be able to ship the whole quantity of Fencing by her. Wilfrid Garrison wishes to return, also James Maxwell, who is to be married next Spring.  
C. Smith had not ordered a continuation of his Newspapers.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicates of our two last Despatches on the 4<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>v</sup>. we acknowledge your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 446 dated the 19<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> Sept<sup>v</sup>, which arrived on the 2<sup>nd</sup> instant with Enclosures correct, except two noted further on.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 446, 5. Our Despatches by the Frosmos direct Steamers shall be posted in future, only sending the Invoices and bulky Enclosures by the Captain with strict injunctions for him to deliver immediately.

3. Par 6. After these explanations we shall not engage any more Shepherds from the Isle of Harris, we agree with you that Mr. Fleming of Dundee engages good men but we must warn him not to promise so much as he sometimes does, at present we have six applicants upon our list three having been out before and three related to men in our service.

4. Par 8. We wrote Mr. Bonner for particulars of his Estate and he informs us he is not going to sell but returns by the present Steamer so you will be able to learn his reasons for this change, we made the calculation you mention of 6½ lbs Wool per Sheep and find that the 235 bales Wool ex 'Granville' 16 Aug 87 would show that he has 14,547 Sheep. Though the Board agrees with you that it would be beneficial to get rid of a dangerous neighbour who does not keep his flocks clear of Scab they have not ~~on~~ an amount of spare Cash for such an outlay, capital might be raised by

Debentures at a moderate rate of interest but this necessitates a low figure for the first cost of the Estate and most economical management afterwards to make it pay with the low price of Wool as at present, should Mr. Bonner make any further proposal the fullest particulars must be sent as he states that he has not any documents, accounts &c. on this side.

5. Par 9. With respect to a Lighthouse upon Bull Point to prevent the wrecks that occur on that coast we took a chart of the Falklands and the enlarged one of the Bay of Caribou to Lloyd's, who inform us copy of your letter of 9<sup>th</sup> Sept. last has been sent to the Board of Trade - as the copy of this was not enclosed in your Despatch they have kindly sent us a copy - and they forward a copy of the Board of Trade's letter dated 29 Sept 85 upon this same subject, by which it appears that the proposal does not meet with approval as the Trade suffering from shipwrecks have not applied for the protection of a Lighthouse and consequently dues cannot be instituted for the cost and support of the same: we presume Lloyd's will send you further particulars and we shall be happy to assist any proposal deemed necessary for the benefit of the Colony.

6. The Directors are very much pleased with the report at Par 13 of the extra value of Buildings upon the Co's Property in comparison with their book value here, we have considered for some time that our Depreciation has been high, but concluded it ought not to be reduced without valid reason, now however the Auditors will be instructed that for the present it will not be necessary to continue this reduction.

P. Par 16. We are extremely sorry to hear that Fetter's Fencing at Telembria 10 May 84 is not approved, it is most difficult to decide what kind should be sent, as no fixed pattern was used at the commencement; tho' this of Fetter's supplies posts for every 13 feet they need not be used at that distance if you have found that 20 yards is near enough, and through the makers advise the slight wires at the bottom you can order the heavier wires to be put there, which is certainly more reasonable for our class of Sheep - Mr. Theophilus Ricketts who has put up hundreds of leagues in Argentine Republic has kindly undertaken to give some plans and sketches of the best fencing, prices of Vanduby wood Posts, where to get them - he says the two strand galvanized steel wire is not so good as the old plain oiled wire. The Board have had estimates and samples from various Firms here and have ordered Messrs. Rowson Drew & C° to supply the following, 10 tons N. 6 Wire varnished, 1 1/2 tons Barb Wire galv., 5 cwt Tying Wire N. 6 galv. from Dortmund to be shipped at Antwerp by present Steamer - and 700 Standards 3 ft 9 in, 300 Straining Brackets, 6,500 Dropers manufactured by Bain, Edinburgh, to be shipped by the 'Orissa' at Liverpool as they could not be ready in time for the Steamer, it is most unfortunate the delivery of the latter will be delayed, but I do not see how you can use them earlier than next February or March. The Dropers are those used for the Corrimony Fence and are strongly recommended by one of the Directors whose firm ship them heavily to New Zealand and Australia - we have ordered specimens for keeping here so that this style of Fence may be adhered to in future - it is cheaper than former kinds; if the borings for the wires are incorrect you must say what the distances ought to be, Arnold has not

sent the distances of the borings of the wood palings be supplied.

8. Par 17. The Directors took upon your coaling scheme for the 'Great Britain' as too expensive & uncertain for the C° to undertake; upon being explained to a large coaling Firm, it was pronounced most hazardous, as quick coaling can never be managed from a bulk; they have had to give up an outlying station on this account, the only speedy way being by four or more lighters on each side of a steamer with 40 or more men on board each of them - Capt<sup>r</sup> Collins & Co's letter of 10<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> enclosed gives description of coaling which will be useful to you - one of the Steamer firms mentioned said the price of a ton was prohibitory and enquired what quantity of cargo we could guarantee for their steamers to bring to London, they also objected to the divergence which is close upon 220 nautical miles - we shall hear how you get on with the bags by this conveyance in coaling the German Steamers.

On the 28<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> we received Telegram Home N<sup>o</sup>. 64 - "Forward paricula stockitura bales" meaning that you had sold the Gt Britain's Coals to the Thomas C° at 27/6 per ton and they were to have 1200 bales of Wool to bring to London - I immediately reported this to Mr. Stande and in consequence the Gr<sup>r</sup> 'Uarda' will coal at Stanley instead of Montevideo, I wrote by her on 5<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>, as per copy enclosed, she left Antwerp on 7<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>. By records of deliveries there are 1,563 tons remaining, please send prices of the various sales, the quantities being duly given.

9. Par 18. We are sorry that our Engineer Mr. Costello has given notice to leave, but trust you will be able to induce him to remain as the Board has given you permission to increase his pay, which would doubtless induce his wife to return - if not, hire "Tornabam" as before, which would arrive here 6 or 31 Jan 88 for a new man to be despatched to Metapedia end of Feb<sup>r</sup> or Lusor 10 March 88. Since writing the foregoing I find from the Agreement, dated

The 20<sup>th</sup> March 1886 that Mr. Costello undertook to serve three years and there is no permission for him to give notice so that he is bound to remain in our service until 19 June 89; you had better bring this to his notice and compromise the matter if necessary so that he remains in charge until we have time to find a suitable Engineer - he is not entitled to a free passage back until he has served five years.

10. Par 21. On receipt of Despatch I sent Prof.

Frankland a Mail Table and offered my services, I regret to report that he writes on the 15<sup>th</sup> inst. that he had not received the sample of Water for Analysis, I therefore immediately wrote the Crown Agents for the Colonies asking them to send it on at once it being of importance to have an Analysis go out by present Mail if possible. The Directors are glad to hear that H. C. Govt. Herr now defers to the wishes of the Colonists. We have not received the Government Balance Sheet for last year, please send it.

11. Par 23. We regret extremely that the Draft

for £15 favor of Mr. Rudd was not paid on presentation here, this mistake occurred during my absence in the Country, to make it good we asked the Pacific C. to receive £15.16. and instruct their Agents at Sandy Point to pay it over to Mr. Yonge, which they kindly undertook to do, I wrote on the 15<sup>th</sup> inst. (the first Steamer after arrival of your Despatch) to Messrs. Wethrall & C. and Mr. E. Stanton Yonge, as per copies enclosed, and trust the explanations will be satisfactory - the copy of your letter to Mr. Yonge in reply to his of 15 Sep 84 was not found in the Despatch.

12. Par 24. It is most annoying that there is

again a trouble about the Newspapers which are posted with great regularity and are paid for upon being weighed at the Post Office, we have complained to the Chief Office who

have promised to search into the matter, at present the Times is posted by itself and the other papers separately.

13. Gloyd's reported on 31<sup>st</sup> ult. that the Sheep-herders had put in for medical advice. On the 3<sup>rd</sup> instant we received Mf's<sup>r</sup> Lewis Anderson & C<sup>o</sup>: Letter of 20<sup>th</sup> Oct<sup>r</sup> re-plying yours about a vessel to be built at Nova Scotia sent so long ago as the 23<sup>rd</sup> August last, as it did not give any particulars to enable the Board to decide anything I answered the same day asking for full details and thought it as well to write again on the 7<sup>th</sup> inst. about the tonnage not being more than 110 or 120 tons, which is the size you mentioned as being most suitable. Mf's<sup>r</sup> Dean's vessel the 'Orissa' is detained until the 22<sup>nd</sup> to enable Mr. George Dean returning from America this evening to inspect her, she has been fitted up for conveying passengers round the Islands, we are informed that another vessel will be purchased by them and both will be employed in Island work and in bringing the Produce of Mr. Dean's clients to England in order to prevent Mf's<sup>r</sup> Townsend & Spearing getting this business: enclosed is copy of our letter by the 'Orissa'.

14. The Bill on the Falkland Islands Meat Co.  
for £82.7.6 has only been accepted on our undertaking to return them £4.5.- for Telegrams which they have paid to Mr. Humphreys as per statement herewith: they have sent a Certificate from the 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> Officers that the 3 casks of Tallow missing in 'Selimbris' 26 Sep<sup>r</sup> 84 were never shipped. As their St. Metapedia will only make one voyage next year they trust that we shall supply her with 6,000 Sheep and the Board wishes you to use the best exertions to provide this number for them next May, when the Sheep being in good condition we shall get a full price for them.

15. We learn from the Cosmos C<sup>o</sup>: that the 'Totnes' carries a Surgeon out and home: having to continue the Insurance upon the Gt Britain Coal next week

I asked the Flotmos Co: how many tons they expected their Steamers would take this year, they state about 900 tons under ordinary circumstances to the Pbis Narda and Tolmes going out and the Letos returning, but this will chiefly depend upon the weather they meet with at Stanley as the Captains are instructed not to lose too much time upon these operations.

16. Capt: Alazia has called here several times I have shown him many attentions, enclosed is letter for his wife and I am going to ask Mr: Bonner to take a small parcel for his wife - also a parcel of clothes for Mr: Langdon. You have not advised Capt: Gurrer's order for £36.8. or the Bill in his favor £150. M: P: C: Gellert wishes to return with his family, W: Rudd does not appear to be in the Co: service now, he agreed to be answerable for Gellert's expenses; is he in the Colony & still willing to pay?

17. Referring to par 8 I have seen Mr: Brickland the Managing Director of the New Zealand Shipping Co: who states that their Steamers could never call, as Rio suits them so well, he would not tell me the exact price of Coals there but implied it was not much more than  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a ton, their Steamers can stow sufficient coals in bunkers to get to Rio and these bunkers could not be used for cargo if not used for Coals, considering the divergence, the delay and the bad weather at times he did not believe any Steam Co: would ever be induced to call at Stanley, we must therefore decline for the present to go to any expense upon this matter.

18. Mr: Theophilus Ricketts, who has managed the Santa Fe Land Co: Estate up the Parana, says the best Fencing is made with plain annealed black wire <sup>N:6</sup> varnished and advises that we should get down men used to this work under contract from that Province, who would put up fencing at less cost than we could do it with our

Laborers, a sketch of a fence from him is enclosed, the Nam-duby straining Posts and drops could be obtained from the same part through our Agents at Montevideo, he speaks favorably of M<sup>r</sup>. John Moore V.C. of that City for any Agency work - unfortunately he has not given the price of the hard wood.

19. By the enclosed Bill of Lading and General Invoice you will note the cargo of 'Orissa' these Stores and those by the present Steamer execute Orders 64, 65 & 66, the last N<sup>o</sup> 67 received 2<sup>nd</sup> inst. will be sent by P.V. Mene's 14 Jan 88 except we find it necessary to detain the heavy bulky goods for the 'Metapedia'. Through Rowson's Druggery is entered in the 'Times' General Invoice at £ 8. 1. 7 They have not yet furnished invoice for the Fencing Wire shipped at Antwerp. The account of the realization of the 'C. C. Bonniers' Sundries £ 42. 15. 4 is not good though every pains were taken to obtain the best prices - the Boiler ex 'Wasp' is valued at £ 40 though we fear it must now be some time before such an article can be sold.

20. By copy of letter from the Falkland Islands M<sup>r</sup> C. of 14<sup>th</sup> inst. received this morning you will perceive that their S<sup>r</sup>. 'Metapedia' is not to leave until the middle of March and unfortunately there appears to be a doubt whether they can carry on the business, should this voyage be abandoned you ought to know as early as possible in order to melt down our old Sheep we should therefore ask them to give a decision at the earliest possible moment and then telegraph the word "Brownful" the very next opportunity.

21. M<sup>r</sup>. Jekyll Glassier V.C. of Lincoln now manufactures a Sheep Dip invented by Prof<sup>r</sup>. Richard W. Fison of the Royal Veterinary College which appears from the Circular herewith to have many advantages, they have sent half a gallon for trial which will be taken out by Mr. W. H. Cameron, who returns by this Steamer with his Nephew, as well as a parcel of Clothes for Mr. Langdon and small parcel for Mr. Alzia if Mr. Bonner does not call here as promised, he has not come so is probably gone direct to Dartmouth from Liverpool.

your description of the excellent Camp inspection made  
in Lafonia and are delighted that the interior proves  
better than expected which will enable the C° to increase  
their flocks - fencing is doubtless a necessity for real good  
economical management, we shall therefore send out  
the materials intended for and more fencing as last shipped  
by Rowson & C°, though it was intended not to ship more  
until you had reported on this in comparison to former sup-  
plies - and also provide a Tent or moveable Hut as proposed  
Par 6. It is unfortunate that the Peat smoke damages the Galva-  
nized iron Roofing, you have not ordered any Oxide of Iron  
paint but we shall send some and are enquiring about some  
Patent Roofing Felt which might prevent damage if laid  
over the part liable to the peat smoke.

5. Par 20. It is most unfortunate that Mr. Costello  
our Engineer still wishes to leave, when the Board heard  
that we should have to telegraph 'Brownfield' they ordered

"offer Costello increase" to be added, this is however set on one side by Telegram Home N. 69 'Tornabani' received 9<sup>th</sup> inst. 9.55 am, that an Engineer is to be engaged and sent out by Mail of 10 March 88 according to our Despatch 696, 9 - we shall therefore do our best to carry this out and if opportunity offers will "Bractify" on 10<sup>th</sup> prox: or 4<sup>th</sup> March denoting an Engineer is engaged and will leave by the S. L. Luxor on 10<sup>th</sup> March next arriving 13<sup>th</sup> April, which would enable Costello to explain every thing to him as he could not leave until 14 May P. Getos.

6. Par 29. It is most difficult as you observe to decide the best plan of getting out Spars and rough Stores, we have asked Mr. Dean if he would combine in chartering a vessel but he cannot as the 'Dennis Brundit' is coming back and will then convey Stores out - with 50 tons House Coals there is not much, you say send half that is ordered for the next Steamer but there is so little of this that we imagine part of the Indent must have been left behind, from the length and size of the Spars even with a timber port we should require a fair sized vessel, it is therefore determined to wait for the next Mail in before chartering, especially as you may be able to reply to mine of 25 Nov 87 about Stores by vessel for West Falkland and order a quantity of rough stuff and give some idea about casks for Tallow. Townsend & Spearings 'Nithsdale' is to sail on 6<sup>th</sup> prox: They have declined to take out a young woman for Mr. Holmested who wished me to arrange her passage. Par 30. We are sorry to hear the York-shire Coals are not approved, Mr. Dean always has them from Grimsby so we thought we could not do better than follow suit, but must in future if possible go to Newcastle or some other Northern port. The Stores by the present Steamer

are Indents 67 and 68, the Kosmos Freight on the rough is reduced to 4% and 5% meter cube and the Genl. Grm. Nav. C. to  $\frac{6}{8}^{\text{d}}$  commencing at N<sup>o</sup>. 4084 and the Iron Roofing, Hay and Cement, also the Wire shut out of last steamer.

7. We send you some Post Office Mail Tables for this year, for the first time dates are given for Supplementary Mails by the Pacific Steamers through Lisbon - There are also some Mail Tables of the Royal Mail C. Your Despt. contained 16 Post Cards without any remark which are kept for explanation. We enclose Admiralty Notices of the Argentine Settlements on Tierra del Fuego and Staten Ild, having supplied the Kosmos C., their Agents, Mr. Grubenrauch &c. The 'Genesta' is insured for £1700 to the end of June including voyage to England. Lloyd's sent us particulars of your telegrams about 'Acalon', 'Cimbrian' & 'Ocean Rover'. Mr. George Dean told me he would return on the 7<sup>th</sup> prox. by the Pacific Steamer through Sandy Point.

8. Upon further consideration of the chartered vessel it appears it would be wise to engage a rather full sized one so as to be able to bring back the Wool you state in N<sup>o</sup>. 447, it could be collected in sufficient quantity to fill the 'Telenbria' - onwards there would also be the Engineer's Wife & family and Furniture as Mrs. Costello believes her husband would sell his, and female Servant for Mr. Colmester - if she sails end of Feb<sup>r</sup> so middle March she would be able to return about the time the Telenbria or Metapedia would have started and so be here for the fourth series of Wool sales.

9. The F. & P. Meat Co's affairs having to be closed under legal advice you must not sell the Coals, I shall ask the Board to offer to buy them and if accepted shall wire "Frugally".

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 14<sup>th</sup> ult. we acknowledge your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 649 which arrived on the 31<sup>st</sup> ult. all in order.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 649, 6. When your former complaint on the non-delivery of Newspapers arrived we wrote directly on the 4<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup> last to the Post Office who replied that the matter should be looked into, we presume therefore that the office would be carefully watched from that date and we trust since then the papers have all arrived, if not send particulars of those missing and a further complaint shall be made or different arrangement instituted.

3. Par 38. We have not yet had further reply from Messrs Anderson & C<sup>o</sup> of Lunenburg about the Nova Scotian vessel but will bear in mind your remarks on same should the Board decide to order a schooner before you come to England, with respect to your visiting Nova Scotia on your way home the Directors decided yesterday that they would leave this to yourself and the following Telegram will be sent on 10<sup>th</sup> inst. to catch the steamer at Montevideo "Home via Scotia if think desirable" which ought to reach you 14<sup>th</sup> inst., then as you will learn on the same date that the F. D. Meat C<sup>o</sup> are winding up you might be able to arrange to leave 19<sup>th</sup> March on receiving this Despatch. We are in treaty with a very good Engineer so hope to be able to add the word "fructify".

4. Par 14. The Board leaves the arrangements for another Coal Contract with the Admiralty entirely in your hands as you can best judge the price they will accept, the "Great Britains" Coals are going fast

so you are to telegraph if more are required. Mssrs.<sup>rs</sup> Burness & C° have again been here about coaling a small French Steamer the 'Parisien' going from Marseilles to Panama, they implied she might require 50 to 100 tons and I said the price you would fix would be 40/- to 50/- per ton, the correspondence is enclosed - you have not named the price we ought to ask for Coals so please do this. Upon calling lately on the Chilean Consul Mssrs. Henry Kendall & Sons 50 Old Broad St., Mr. Kendall told me that the Lota Coal C° supplied other ports north of Lota with Coals at 14/- a ton by their Team Colliers, it might answer our purpose for you to enquire into this as on an emergency we might get a supply from Lota. We are in treaty to buy the F. D. Metal Co.<sup>Coals</sup> and if not reported by this Despatch shall write on 10<sup>th</sup> through Lisbon, are there not some Scores & other plant of theirs at Darwin we ought to have list.

5. Para 28, 31. We are sorry to hear that you fear there is something wrong with accounts for the repairs and supplies to the 'Bidston Hill', if you learn anything further the Directors consider that you ought as Lloyd's Agent to report your suspicions to the authorities there though of course this must be done with the utmost caution - we shall enquire of our Underwriters about the charges to general or particular averages and let you know.

6. Para 23, 24. Canvas shall be obtained in future from Hindley and the Harness replaced as you describe.

7. Para 25. We regret to learn that the Lambing has been damaged by the late unfavorable weather as your Summer has been so much below the average temperature

8. Para 28. As before reported we are quite willing to undertake the supply of Scores &c for the West Falklanders under your instructions as to time and mode of shipment, the Metal Co's steamer being stopped creates a difficulty but this can doubtless be overcome on consultation with you here, since the Directors think it would be wise to arrange the whole matter when you are in London.

9. Par 30. Some time since we endeavoured to obtain Shipping Agencies as you now advise and wrote to a great number of Firms at Liverpool, Glasgow &c, but none of them took any interest in the matter many saying that they left such business entirely in the hands of their Captains, another attempt shall however now be made as you have recommended some good names.

10. Par 41. It is too bad that H. E. Afford has not repaid the advance of £5 made to him at Dartmouth on 12 Sep 87 to get out by the 'Plio', as in the receipt sent you he undertook to pay on arrival at Stanley you have just grounds for seeing him & we trust this will be done.

11. Par 43. Respecting your furlough to England you will perceive by Par 3 that the Board are willing that you should leave as early as is consistent with your duties at Stanley, and as the Meat Co's business will not now detain you, you will doubtless be able to leave by the 19<sup>th</sup> Mch unless something unforeseen happens; should you find that the route through Nova Scotia would be too long or uncertain in being carried out you might run over from here, as by that time Mess<sup>rs</sup> Anderson would surely have drawn up Plans and particulars for a vessel and thus be able to commence building at once.

12. Par 46. When Mr. Cameron came here about advances of Cash there was no objection made to doing this as I merely remarked you had not named any amount and he therefore received just what he required and was treated with the utmost attention & kindness as is the invariable practise at this Office. W<sup>r</sup> D. Pitt has declined the £50 remittance from Mr. G. A. Cobb as per Statement N<sup>o</sup>. 217 dated 21 July 87. Mr. Campbell of Calparg has applied for £26. 2. 11 for Provisions &c to Mr. Ewan Morrison to whom I write a letter as he promised to pay his Wife's expenses. The 44 cks Tallow

ex Santos 16 Jan 88 have sold at fair prices and I am happy to report that Wool keeps firm. Mr & Mrs Dean are not well enough to return by this Steamer. Capt. Alazia means to return if possible by our vessel - Mr Robson called here the other day and said he should be going back soon. We understand the S.S. 'Wimisdale' will not start so soon as expected. We are in treaty with the 'Minna Helene' a German Boe 340 tons to leave here before the middle of March with rough cargo as per list here with and the option of returning if you can load her with the Wool intended for the Petemuria or any other cargo - a portion of the fine goods will leave by the S.S. 'Memphis' of 5000 gross - Mr Grandje informs us the 'Lusor' is bringing Despatches due here about 12<sup>th</sup> inst. - Mr. Humphreys writes that my letter of 25 Nov last did not catch the 'Tolmes' of 14 Nov 87 at Montevideo, this is unfortunate. We hope you will bring one of the large new Maps with all the Fences on it. We have not quite settled with the P. & M. Meat Co. for their Coals so shall have to write on the 10<sup>th</sup> instant for the supplementary Mail for this Steamer at Lisbon.

Sir,

Our last was dated the 9<sup>th</sup> ult. - Duplicate of your Despatch 450 and N<sup>o</sup>. 451 arrived on the 4<sup>th</sup> ult., the original of the first the next day - Despatch 452 was received on the 1<sup>st</sup> instant.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 450, 3. It is most unfortunate that

there is a discrepancy in the Accounts of the Sales of the Sheepskins, the whole matter has been referred to the Brokers, Messrs. Tuning & Cobb, with our and your remarks and we trust they will be able to provide such accounts as you state are necessary.

3. Part 4. The Coals ex 'Gt Britain' are certainly decreasing more rapidly than expected through the many sales to the Frosno Steamers, we have purchased the 206 tons Coals with sacks belonging to the Falkland Islands Meat C<sup>o</sup> at 25/- ft. ton, the two Bills upon them being deducted in full - the Frosno C<sup>o</sup> are now writing that our stock is low and imply that we ought to be getting out a supply, nothing will however be done until you are here to advise on this business.

4. N<sup>o</sup>. 452, 2, 3. When you are here will be the time to arrange the business for supplying the West Falklanders with Stores by means of an annual chartered vessel, which could also combine our rough stuff: we have chartered the German 'Boje illina Belene' 340 tons Capt<sup>r</sup> Carl Maager as she has a timber port to take in the spars you have ordered sometime since, she has the House & Smithy Coals required, the bricks, pressed hay &c and a portion of Indents 69, 70 and 71, the smaller portion of these fine goods going by the present Steamer;

It is unfortunate you now say that Fencing Posts are not required because we ordered a quantity as you stated in N<sup>o</sup> 448, 29 that 1,500 could go by sailing vessel, these were ordered and cannot be taken back by Arnold nor can he get Mr. Dean to ship them by the 'Dennis Brundrit' to leave end of next week, the 'M. Helene' sails 12<sup>th</sup> or 13<sup>th</sup> instant.

She carries a great quantity of Furniture for our Engineer Mr. Peter Noble who goes out with his wife and four children by the present Steamer, second class, under Agreement dated the 18<sup>th</sup> ult. for a term of five years from arrival at Stanley, which is now enclosed, he has received an advance of Thirty Pounds (£30) against his pay of £150 a year rising by £10 yearly to £200 and has agreed to pay Fifteen Pounds (£15) towards the extra expense of his family accompanying him by Steamer.

Capt<sup>n</sup>. Maager has been most careful in all matters for us and I beg you will show him every attention, he is very anxious to come back for us so I hope this can be arranged by loading the 'Minna Helene' with the Wool stated at 447, 14 bales collected for the 'Glembria', though Mr. Staudt writes that probably the 'Ramses' homeward bound from Central America will call at Stanley for cargo, he reports that the 'Denderah' due at Havre 20<sup>th</sup> inst. has 450 bales Wool for us, the Hanbyses having already brought 625 bales Wool. This affording to see that by Par<sup>g</sup> you anticipate a full cargo for a chartered vessel after satisfying the 'Thosmos' & sending the 'Genesta' to London, and as my letter of 10<sup>th</sup> ult. with Charter of 'Minna Helene' would reach you with our last Despatch there would no necessity to communicate with M. Vido about chartering there; as we should like to know if the 'Minna Helene' returns with our cargo and you may be telegraphing by the Mail of 8<sup>th</sup> June the word 'Kingdom' as before will denote this.

5. Par<sup>s</sup> 14 to 17. We have told our suppliers to be more careful about weights: Oldham will arrange for Coffee to be roasted in bond for the next order, this is quite a new Customs regulation. The Edinburgh Ropery &c have only allowed 7½% discount on their two last accounts which has come to this Office for prompt payment, they deny that their Canvas is inferior to former qualities and ask for samples of

the Canvas complained of: after the present pressure of business is over we shall examine the unfortunate breakdown of the Walker Creek Wool Prefs.

6. Par 18. The Board is quite willing to assist the Government in establishing a Savings Bank at Stanley for the Colony so I called upon the Crown Agents and Mr. Wingfield at the Colonial Office but the matter had not yet been considered, I told the latter that we would accept drafts at thirty days sight (30%) and he was to have written some for this Mail, we presume these drafts would be remittances of cash paid into the Savings Bank for investment in Government Securities here, Mr. Wingfield implied there would <sup>be</sup> a difficulty in supplying funds for a sudden withdrawal of deposits at Stanley, let us have your opinion upon this point - being for the benefit of the Colony the Directors would not object to Bills on them at ten days sight (10%). You have not replied to our proposals in N<sup>o</sup>. 692, 5 & 694, 6 to allow interest upon the unpaid Wages standing to the credit of our employés.

7. Par 6. It is well that you have mentioned that Joseph Alazia is slippery in money matters for I should have made him a small advance which is now declined, as he has been in the Co<sup>r</sup>. service in command of our vessels we have granted him a passage by the 'Anna Helene' on the understanding he is to pay Capt. Maager for his provisions, under the circumstances I shall insist on his signing an agreement to this effect before embarkation. I shall feel obliged by your informing us in future whether any one coming from the Colony is to be assisted if they are desirous of returning.

8. You did not mention that you were applying for the Agency of the Association of Underwriters & Insurance Brokers at Glasgow, I furnished Mr. Rundell the Secretary with some information he required and learn from him this morning that you are appointed Agent and the documents go out by this Mail, we must now send him our Mail Tables. We have written to a great number of Shipowners for their

Agencies but unfortunately they do not like to bind themselves preferring to leave such business in their Captain's hands. We have furnished information in confidence about the Bottomry Bond & of the 'Bidston Hill' to the Salvage Association and two Insurance Offices who informed me that before your private communication to Lloyd's about her arrived a question had been raised about the great expense of her repairs - when here you will have to go into this business as the authorities at Lloyd's & the Insurance Offices appear to consider that as Lloyd's Agent you are entitled to report dishonorable proceedings in confidence. In reply to your enquiries about Drafts on Owners and Bottomry Bonds for ship's expenses in N.C. 1449, 31 we send Foster & Bevington's letter of 17<sup>th</sup> ult. and Bewitt's letter of 8<sup>th</sup> inst. (the originals, copies kept here) the Secretary of one of the Insurance Offices read the former and said they were a first rate authority. Lloyd's sent us copy of your telegram about the 'Banco Mobiliario' putting into Stanley for medical assistance we immediately wrote the owners Mef. F. G. Tolsch &c, Hamburg, to which they have not replied. Mr. Staade informs that their Steamers 'Luxor' and 'Pbis' are sold. I was told at the Admiralty that st. M.S. 'Rapid' from Australia is ordered to call at Stanley, so she may require Coals. The 'Dennis Brundish' is to sail end of next week, I believe Mr. Dean has taken 50 tons Stores from Frooton & Gates for C. Williams which we declined thinking he would do the same to prevent this storekeeper's competition.

9. We enclose correspondence with Mr. C. C. Baker the Liquidator of the Falkland Islands Meat Co. and List of their property at the Colony to explain the position of that Company. Mr. Baker called on the 7<sup>th</sup> and stated that he could not name a price for the Steam Launch 'Pioneer' to hold good until your arrival as she is offered to others but this is immaterial as we consider she is not suitable. He will feel obliged by the printed Notices being exhibited wherever they will be seen by the public, some being sent to West Falkland for this purpose: if any of the goods named would be serviceable to us let us know the price we ought to offer, one

we ought to offer, one of the Scows has been offered to Mr. Robson for £70 (Seventy Pounds) to be allowed in full off his Bill for £101.2.7, he considerably declined to purchase believing that we wanted it but Mr. James Waller having said these scows were not of much account I wrote Robson he had better buy it as he thereby got so much of his claim in full. Mr. Hampfrees has debited us with £10.4.2 his claim upon the Mail C°, this Bill has been presented but no reply at present, we wrote him yesterday that we could not entertain it and he must apply to the Liquidator.

10. The National Insurance C° are willing to reduce the premium upon our Fire insurances for Stores provided hazardous goods are stored separately in a proper place by themselves, believing this can be arranged the next renewals will be at a lower rate.

11. Dr. Dale asked for two payments to be made for him by his last letter, this has been done but he is told that such business must pass through your Office first. Dr. T. A. Going proceeds by this Steamer to undertake the duties of Government Apothecary Surgeon for West Falkland, his wife and infant are to follow him by next Mail. Mr. & Mrs. George Dean also return, he takes out Mr. Stark as Clerk being the brother of a gentleman many years with Capt<sup>r</sup>. H. Langridge &c°. Mr. Willans proposes to return in July or August. Enclosed are new Mail Tables to be distributed to our employés, unfortunately the Rosmos C° could not give a departure for June as they talk of altering to a three weekly service.

Sir, We enclose Triplicate of N<sup>o</sup>. 700 and Duplicates of N<sup>o</sup>. 701 and our letter of 16<sup>th</sup> ult. 'Dennis Brundish', conveying the £5 Copper Specie asked for by Statement upon Accounts N<sup>o</sup>. 229, and acknowledge your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 453 and 454 which arrived on 16<sup>th</sup> ult. - on the 24<sup>th</sup> ult. we received <sup>from Havre</sup> your two Envelopes dated 9<sup>th</sup> February containing the 'Denderah's' two Bills of Lading for 398 bales Wool and 24 bales Sheepskins and the 'Denderah's' receipt for 100 tons Coals ex 'Great Britain'.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 453, 2. You are certainly justified in the satisfaction expressed about the profits made upon last year's transactions, the Farm and Store Accounts showing so well, the profit on the 'Great Britain's' coaling account is also good and shows how well you have managed the whole affair.

3. Paro 5, 6. We have fortunately obtained Page 9 of the New Zealand Canterbury Times of 15 July 87 containing the account of the Action for damages through Sheep being killed from a poisonous Dip, Mr. M<sup>c</sup> Dougall wishes to see you about his Dip as there has been a Legal Action between his firm and Cooper. We have complained

to the Post Office about the nondelivery of Newspapers.

4. N<sup>o</sup>. 454, 2. We trust our former advices about the charter of the 'Minna Helene' will prevent your offer of the extra Wool and Sheepskins to the Flormos C°, as we should like Capt<sup>r</sup> Maager to be rewarded for the good cargo taken hence, though he had already taken Oregon spars below and she was getting to her loaded mark. He received two more on deck and we trust you will render every assistance by means of the 'Gr Britain's' cranes to get these off as they are so heavy - we write him that the case of Bow Ramps ordered to be numbered 4,645 went on board without a number and is not entered on the Bill of Lading. Arnold assures us the full number of <sup>Larch Posts</sup> Pales, and Doppers were sent alongside, they were slowed at odd times hence the Mate only ticked off the numbers entered on Bill of Lading, we trust however the Invoice number will be found on board. We ought to have told you that Capt<sup>r</sup> Darcy were able to get the 54 tons Smilly Coals direct from Brancepeth Colliery as per certificate now sent. The 'Minna Helene' passed the Lizard on 18<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> so might arrive the same time as this.

5. Par 3. The Board can hardly decide the best plan to settle the Wages on hand that are offered for interest at 2½ per cent and are rather inclined to let them go to the Government Savings Bank, at all events they decided that if to remain with the C° there must a regulation for six months notice of withdrawal for sums over Twentyfive Pounds (£25), as last years Accounts now prove so good and some urge that all the Profit ought not to be divided we might reserve some ready Cash to meet drafts from Stanley for Savings Bank investments and so reduce

our heavy liabilities that way - Mr. Wingfield has not sent any proposal for term of drafts upon this C° for the Stanley Savings Bank, so I suppose he has written for further details on this business.

6. The Order for Forty Pounds (£40) dated 26<sup>th</sup> Jan<sup>87</sup>. last, favor of W. W. Pitt was not advised - and it ~~is~~ <sup>I should</sup> to have been reported that the Frosmos C° had paid £11.6.1 to the Stanley Office for the Freight charged for the Coal Bags p. 'Times' 19 Nov 87 - we reminded them of this on the 22<sup>nd</sup> ult. and they sent us the receipt for this sum dated 29 Dec 87. I regret to have to state that there is an error in our last Mail Table of 1<sup>st</sup> ult., the Out Mail next May should be on the 29<sup>th</sup> not 31<sup>st</sup>, leaving M. Video 25<sup>th</sup> June.

7. We have received an unsatisfactory letter dated 29<sup>th</sup> Feb<sup>87</sup> from Lewis Anderson &c of Lunenburg stating that they could not contract for building a vessel before next June and offering two vessels of 100 and 96 tons for £1,354 and £1,145 the names not being given, we replied on 17<sup>th</sup> ult. that we could not make any decision until you were here or had called upon them on your passage to England.

We avail of the Supplementary Mail by this Steamer to acknowledge your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>s 455 and 456 which arrived on the 31<sup>st</sup> ultimo.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 455, 3. Our Wool has certainly been shipped uncommonly early this year the 'Hambyes' delivered on 12<sup>th</sup> ult. 625 bales, the 'Denderah' on 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. 398 bales and 24 bales Sheepskins, which enables the Wool being offered on the 20<sup>th</sup> inst. prices being good now. This is most unfortunate the men are waiting for fencing but we could not help the Steamer refusing it at Antwerp through being full.

3. Par 5. You justly observe that the confidence placed in the Company by our men is very gratifying as they wish to leave so much money in our hands, the Directors cannot however decide whether to retain it at 2½ per cent interest or let them invest in the Government Savings Bank just established until the matter is talked over with you, as this business would lead to a great increase of office work in keeping the many accounts, calculating interest &c besides the risk of sudden withdrawals.

4. Par 6. You have done quite right to make a charge upon parcels and goods going to the Camp by our vessels, and our people appear to con-

-sider it is but fair as there have been no complaints on the subject, I have often thought we ought not to convey boxes of goods from the Shepherds friends in Scotland by our vessels and perceiving that Mr. Hinnon's box from Grant by the 'Minna Helene' was large told you to charge a guinea freight as there must have been goods for sale in it, when you are here we must consider what should be done under such circumstances.

5. Par 8<sub>115</sub>. We are very glad to hear that you need not resort to boiling down the Sheep which cannot be refrigerated as there is ground to keep them for producing Wool which of course brings in more money than Tallow, we have not heard whether any one will send a steamer for March of next year and fear this business cannot be recommenced at present. We had a visit lately from the Liquidator of the F. & G. Meat C° and as he said he would rather sell the whole of their property at the Colony to this C° instead of getting a number of offers from other people, we send another List of these goods with the value they put upon them to enable you to say what sum we might offer for the whole lot, as you say we want one of the trolleys and we could probably bring other things into use.

6. Par 16. I am sorry the arrival of the 63 Sheararks has caused you so much trouble, with respect to your not being told of these birds coming I presumed that Dr. Dale had told you that he had said they could be reared in the Colony if sent out and that I was endeavouring to do this, it is unfortunate that the C° has been put to expense for them as reported in the next Despatch but if their presence cheers our people this small outlay is well made.

7. N<sup>o</sup>. 456, 4. The Directors have decided to ship 350 to 400 tons Ocean Merthyr Steam Coals if freight can be obtained at 22/- per ton the price you name, & though a great number of Spars have been shipped by the 'Umina' 'Eclene' we may forward some longer ones if possible to be obtained at Cardiff: we learn that Capt<sup>r</sup>. Maager has received the five guinea gratuity though this is not due, according to our ideas, until completion of the Charter, his Shipbroker is therefore informed that we cannot pay this sum until we hear that the Charter is fulfilled.

8. Par 6. It is most unfortunate you are likely to be inconvenienced on your passage to England by quarantine at Montevideo, we are surprised at not receiving a Telegram by the 19<sup>th</sup> March Rome Mail, we hear from Mr. Staudt that the 'Ramses' left Monte Video on 31<sup>st</sup> ult. and he fears this late departure is through detention at Stanley, she seems to have been substituted for the 'Theben' which left Valparaiso 2<sup>nd</sup> April for Stanley to coal and being due on 14<sup>th</sup> April you will be able to send two Despatches at that time.

9. We received this morning at 9.45 am your Telegram from M. Video "Gentefolk Scotia deput libernal Britannia incontesta Elminster Lewes" reporting "Cannot go to Nova Scotia the delay is too great coming home by the Britannia inform my friends at Elminster and Lewes" - This will be attended to. Sir, We forward Duplicates of our two last Despatches on the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> ult. and acknowledge Mr. Cobb's Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 457 of 16<sup>th</sup> March, the Duplicate arrived on the 30<sup>th</sup> ult. the Original yesterday with Enclosures all correct.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 457, 2. It is good that Mr. Cobb has been so thoroughly all through the Camp as he will be able to explain everything to the Directors and arrange that future shipments of Fencing are of the kind which is found suitable for the Colony, with respect to the assertion that the Wire P. Menes 14 Jan 88 is a lighter number than N<sup>o</sup>. 6 we shall complain to Messrs. Rowson Drew & C<sup>o</sup>: but we ought to have had a sample sent and request that this may be done.

3. Par 8, g. The remarks about Stores sent out shall be attended to, we are quite willing to purchase in the cheapest market if we knew where to find it, the paraffin was supplied by Fling & Browne by special order but we have not had any from them for nearly two years.

4. Par 11. It is unfortunate there has been a misunderstanding about the £326.12. - paid to the Agra Bank for Mr. Holmested, his letter asking for this payment, dated 9 July 88 received 30 Aug 88, told me to debit the Firm with the amount so I paid the Cheque to the name of Holmested & Blake but have now written the Bank to transfer it to Holmested's private account, with request that they will explain the matter to him, I also write him.

Telegram Cut N. 45 "Clearage" standing in A.B.C. Code for "Cannot supply Coal" and trust you will receive it with the last Despatches.

M<sup>r</sup>. Ceser Wehrhahn 12 Rathauskraße, Hamburg, has informed us that he charters vessels with Coals for the West Coast of America and asks whether we would allow him half the commission charged to them if they put into Stanley under his charterparties needing supplies, repairs &c: we have agreed to do so on his sending names and particulars of his charters, and provided that the vessels are well owned and the Captains are entitled to draw upon their owners, the correspondence is enclosed, as you will see we have asked if he could deliver Coals for us.

6. Par 7. We are pleased to hear that M<sup>r</sup>. Robson's Son has transferred their business from Dean to the C<sup>o</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>. Robson told us some time since he intended to do this, he has called this morning being much annoyed by a letter received yesterday from M<sup>r</sup>. C. M. Dean to report that he has instructed his Son to obtain the Leases of his Farm from M<sup>r</sup>. C. M. Dean and will feel obliged by your accompanying him to Dean's for this purpose, also to get the accounts owing to M<sup>r</sup>s<sup>rs</sup> Dean & Son and send it here that M<sup>r</sup>. Robson may pay M<sup>r</sup>. Dean here, if needful the C<sup>o</sup> is to advance Cash to pay all accounts which M<sup>r</sup>. Robson Jnr<sup>r</sup> guarantees are correct.

7. The Frambyes' and Denderah's Wool sold on the 20<sup>th</sup> ult. at good prices, the Broker's report that the wool dipped with Cooper's and Little's dips are similar the latter being rather heavier but they cannot advise which

would be the better step to continue, correspondence is enclosed.  
Mess<sup>r</sup>. John Coare & C<sup>o</sup> sold on the 1<sup>st</sup> inst<sup>t</sup> a quantity of Wool  
from Sandy Point a good quantity being just the same  
quality as ours at about the same price, we cannot discover  
the names of the Farmers sending this Wool, priced Catalogue sent.

8. The List of Property of the Falkland Islands Meat  
C<sup>o</sup> does not agree with the List received from Mr. Baker the  
Liquidator of which two copies have been sent, we must  
therefore advise him to obtain returns from other Farmers  
where some of the goods may have been left, of course nothing  
can be decided until Mr. Cobb is here; he has of course  
informed that he cannot go to Nova Scotia from M. Vido,  
he writes us that he has heard from Capt<sup>r</sup>. Fowler of 'Pelembria'  
that there can hardly be as much as 206 tons Coals left  
by her at Granby, as this is the quantity we paid for great  
care must be taken in weighing them as we must claim  
for any less quantity handed over to us.

9. Having issued a new Mail Table a number  
are sent for distribution to our people - we have invested

Enclosing Duplicate of our last on the 5<sup>th</sup> instant we acknowledge your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 458, dated 14<sup>th</sup> ult., received on the 23<sup>rd</sup> instant and have to report that Mr. Cobb arrived in England on the 13<sup>th</sup> instant. We had already heard from Montevideo of the unfortunate death of Mr. George Dean on board the "Memphis" on the 1<sup>st</sup> ult. on his passage out.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 458, 9. We regret much that the coils of Fencing Wire P. Menes' 14 Jan 88 do not prove to be of the same length, on complaining to Messrs. Rowson Drew & Co: they state there is no definite length in a coil though the estimated length of N<sup>o</sup>. 6 Wire per cwt is 397 yards and that these were shipped in the usual way, this length is very different to that reported - Messrs. Dennis & C<sup>o</sup>: state that the German Wire supplied by them measures about 390 yards per coil of N<sup>o</sup>. 6 weighing 1 cwt and the variation in length should be very slight. Referring to second paragraph of our last Despatch respecting this Wire being a lighter gauge than N<sup>o</sup>. 6, Messrs. Rowson Drew & Co: write that the manufacturers have made careful enquiries and have no doubt that N<sup>o</sup>. 6 was shipped, we therefore wait the sample you have to send - Mr. Cobb informs that there were two labels in your office marked 8 and 9, these ought to be forwarded with written evidence of the person finding them on the coils.

3. Part 10. We are sorry to learn that the Coats purchased from the Falkland Islands Meat Co: are so small and damaged and not likely to turn out the 206

sons, intimation of this has been given to the Liquidator and that we shall make a claim if the weight proves short, in this case proper evidence on the subject must be furnished: the Assets of this C. now at the Colony as per Lists sent N. 700, 9 and 703 with values have been offered to us and may probably be purchased when Mr. Costello arrives to describe their condition, usefulness &c so that all this stock at Goose Green must be carefully kept - we hope the next Mail will bring estimated values with lists & positions of the goods not under our care.

4. The Revd. M. H. Philip has again complained to the Directors that the House at Darwin granted to him by the C. has not yet been repaired, we have written him that he is to send a list of the necessary repairs to you and then these must be attended to at once - he is also to be provided with two good working horses.

5. Particulars. We send printed copy obtained at Lloyd's of the York Rules and the York and Antwerp rules upon General Average for vessels. Messrs. Williamson Milligan &c. have applied for return of part of Commission charged on the 'Talisman's' Account as by copy of their letter 14<sup>th</sup> inst., as we were not supplied with her Accounts as is usual copies must be sent to enable us to come to a decision. We are in treaty with the Admiralty for a Coal Contract if accepted we shall have to charter a vessel with 3 to 400 tons and might wire 'Famine' with usual details as formerly. Mr. H. G. Cobb has applied for £800 besides the two sums lately paid him, this will be remitted to him on 31<sup>st</sup> inst.

We have deemed it proper to refund £4.15. - to the Hosmos Steamship C<sup>o</sup> for the extra charge of 2½ per ton on the 38 tons taken by the 'Theben' from the 'Vicar of Bray'. As the Admiralty have decided to enter into another Contract with us for Coals at 50/- a ton through Capt<sup>r</sup>. Kennedy of H.M.S. 'Ruby' at Montevideo we have decided to send 600 tons by the end of this month and forwarded on the 22<sup>nd</sup> ult<sup>v</sup>. Telegram Out N<sup>o</sup>. 46 "Showin<sup>r</sup>s Civil solvib<sup>a</sup>

motto" meaning "we are sending Coals 400 (tons) next month" which we trust reached you with the last Mail: we are endeavouring to charter a small vessel to carry them and the rough Stores lately indentured for but there is trouble in getting one as vessels of a suitable size are scarce and freights going up; Mr. Cobb has written to Capt. Kennedy on the subject, the Admiralty correspondence is enclosed.

3. N<sup>o</sup>. 460, 1. It is unfortunate that the Falkland Islands Meat &c Coals prove to be only 17 $\frac{1}{2}$  tons instead of 206 tons as we are forced to make a claim of £~~40~~ 0 for the deficiency which they repudiate, we have offered a sum for the abets in our possession that has not to the present been accepted though we asked for reply so as to be able to report by this Mail.

4. Par 5. You acknowledge our Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 702 but not the Duplicate of N<sup>o</sup>. 701 which it contained, this went by the 'Minna Helene' and we are disappointed that she had not arrived as we fully expected report of her by this Mail.

5. Par 8. The Board has decided that as the Government have established a Savings Bank the Company cannot hold Deposits at interest, it will be necessary therefore to report this to all our people and pay them off by degrees, they will probably invest in the Savings Bank so that their money will return to our Office for general expenses the Government receiving Drafts on us for the same, when this business was first proposed there was a question as to the number of days sight for the Bills, they preferring ten days whilst we said the time ought to be thirty days, I saw Mr. Wingfield at the Colonial Office to say we ought to have 30 days and he was to communicate with the Governor and report us the result this has not been done and the Directors are willing to accept Bills at 10 days sight if the Government object to thirty days.

6. Our General Meeting was held on the 18<sup>th</sup> ult. when the Annual Report and Accounts for last year were adopted (as enclosed) and a Dividend of 15 per cent with a Bonus of 2½ per cent was declared, the Meeting passed a vote of thanks to the Officers and all in the Co's service which we beg you will intimate to every one, a copy of Resolutions is forwarded.

7. The Wool ex Ramose 10 May 88 was sold on the 22<sup>nd</sup> ult. though at prices rather below what we expected. We regret to find by Mr Peter Noble's letter of 7<sup>th</sup> May received by the last Mail that he is discontented with the Engineer's house at Goose Green and from Mr Costello's remarks we fear there will be trouble with him so send my reply of this date as well as copy of his letter; we had to write him last Mail about a claim made upon him by Capt<sup>r</sup> Garrett &c requesting him to arrange with you for gradual payment of this account for furniture, since then his Uncle has called with an order for £~~4~~<sup>5</sup> monthly which is declined, and we now instruct you not to allow any payments to be made on his account until our advance of £50 (Fifty pounds) has been paid - I wrote him 5<sup>th</sup> May about Garrett's Acc<sup>t</sup> saying the matter would not be mentioned to your Office as I put faith in him but now it is necessary you should know what has occurred.

8. We were grievously annoyed on the 26<sup>th</sup> ult. by receipt of Telegram Home N<sup>o</sup>. 72 "Genesta woodstock" which reports that she is a total wreck, Lloyd's sent copy of their Telegram which stated that the crew were saved - This is a very sad affair as it throws out all arrangements for Produce home, we presume you will send as much as possible by the 'Minna Helene' and if necessary have already taken steps to send to Valparaiso for a Flomos Steamer to call and bring any left over - under this unfortunate loss it becomes more necessary than ever to get out another vessel as soon

as possible up to the present we have unfortunately not been able to decide upon anything.

9. This Steamer conveys a good quantity of Stores as per Indents 73 to 75 except 50 drums Little's Sheep Dips which the Cosmos C° declined to ship so they will be sent by the Coal vessel - we send a new Irish Whiskey from the Bushmill C° strongly recommended by the West Falklanders - the Gun Caps have to be carried on deck at 3d per weight.

10. The Falkland Islands Meat C° have now agreed to accept our offer for their apels in our possession which will be officially communicated to you by the <sup>2nd</sup> Collector of Customs by the next Mail.

2. N° 461, 1. The damaged part of the Darwin Hydraulic Pump was duly received, and another perfect part will be shipped by the 'Rambyss' on 1<sup>st</sup> prox. with further Hydraulic Machinery.

3. Par 2. The wreck of the 'Genesta' is most unfortunate as there will be a loss on her accounts as the insurance had been reduced: we regret that Messrs Holmested & Blake have lost their Stores, you are to tell them that on Mr. Cobb's return he will endeavour to make some compensation to them on our behalf: you did right to have an Enquiry into the cause of the wreck as Capt. Collard was not to blame we have allowed him £ 20 for the loss of his effects. The Hornet's Insurance is increased to £ 5000 though the charge is fourteen quineas per cent.

4. Par 4. We have purchased all the Assets of the Falkland Islands Meat C° in our possession for £ 300, Mr. Waldron has purchased those at Port Howard and Mr. Baker the Liquidator would feel obliged by your sending particulars of any Assets at Weddel Island or other port on the West - we have been obliged to waive the short delivery of Coals ex 'Selenbria'.

5. We have chartered the B. & J. 'Taikun', 326 tons Regr, Capt. J. C. Berkelson, as f. Charter dated 16<sup>th</sup> July, it is feared she cannot take more than 325 to 350 tons Ocean Mersey Steam Coals as the rough goods have suddenly mounted up to so much weight, through strike of colliers

Call and his Sister will go by her also Frazer and the others though they have not written yet.

6. We send copy of Letter from Crown Agents for the Colonies 30<sup>th</sup> ult: about the remittance of Savings Bank funds to England and our reply 31<sup>st</sup> ult: which I fully explained to their satisfaction, also to Mr. Wingfield at the Colonial Office, the C: will therefore now be able to receive from the Government any Cash needed at Stanley by giving Bills on us here at 30<sup>th</sup> if 30<sup>th</sup> is objected to, as we shall now pay off the Shepherd's Wages which they will doubtless put into the Savings Bank so that we expect there will be large transactions in this matter.

7. We have purchased the Yacht 'Castalia' \$19 tons Reg'd from Messrs Camper & Nicholson who are fitting her out for Island service under Mr. Cobb's advice and it is expected she will be ready to sail between the 8<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> prox: under command of Capt<sup>n</sup>. Collard, who will look after her at Gosport on our behalf, he will return after delivering her over to you.

8. We send the St. James' Gazette of 19<sup>th</sup> ult: having an article on the Falklands which has been written by some one from conversations with Mr. J. J. Felton. Mr. Willans and Miss Aldridge return by the 'Hambyes' of 1<sup>st</sup> prox:.. We had hoped to have been able to give some intimation of future mails but the Thosmos C: have not yet sent further sailings of their Steamers.

We enclose Duplicate of our last Despatch 707 on 7<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> and Copy of Letter 40<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> by the Coal Vessel 'Taikun', and regret to inform you that the Mail home due 13<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> has not yet arrived the 'Denderah' having been 20 days late at Monte Video, so that her Mails can hardly be delivered until 5<sup>th</sup> or 6<sup>th</sup> instant.

2. We have sold 14,000 Sheep Bags from the F. P. Meat Co<sup>r</sup> purchase to the River Plate Meat C<sup>o</sup> at two pence each to be delivered at Buenos Ayres as early as possible, as per copy of correspondence herewith.

3. The 'Taikun' sailed from Cardiff on 14<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> unfortunately she could take only 328 tons Steam Coals but filled up with a large quantity of Timber, as well as other Stores ordered by Indents and some Fencing materials. Mr. Dean's chartered vessel 'Jane Brown' 298 tons Reg<sup>r</sup> sailed from Goole on 16<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> with 375 tons Flouse Coals and 103 tons Steam Coals. I hope Mr. Cobb will be able to report to you from Dartmouth about the sailing of the 'Castalia'. Mr. Dean's Drifta arrived on 27<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> having 468 bales Wool, 12 bales Sheepskins and 50 tons Old Iron consigned to him.

4. We send last Mail Table with three more Mails out by the Kosmos Steamers, but cannot enter the Pacific - Mails out because the Kosmos C<sup>o</sup> have not yet fixed their departures from the West Coast and say we must wait a month longer for this information.

Gir, We enclose Duplicate of our last on 1<sup>st</sup> instant and acknowledge your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 462 of 10<sup>th</sup> July which arrived on 4<sup>th</sup> instant, with Enclosures in order, on the 12<sup>th</sup> inst. we received from the S. V. 'Denderah' at Hamburg two Bills of Lading for 229 bales Wool and 66 bales Sheepskins, the first proves to be 159 bales Wool and 71 bales Sheepskins, we trust Robson's 330 Sheepskins are among these as he complains they were ready for shipment fourteen months since.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 462, 1. We consider you have done well to put such a large cargo on the 'Minna Helene' and shall bear in mind your remarks upon her Charter-party: it is unfortunate some of the outward cargo is damaged through the steaming of the wet Timber but it could not be avoided as she was loaded in dreadful weather.

3. Par 1. Up to the present we do not see how we can move in the matter of Mr. Cameron's complaint to the Secretary of State for the Colonies about being fined for landing Stores without a permit.

4. We have had further correspondence with the Crown Agents for the Colonies, about buying Bills here on the Stanley Government for the Savings Bank funds instead of taking our Bills at the reduced sight date for ten days, but shall decline acceding to their terms - so provide you with funds and render the Compt. independent we ship One Thousand Pounds Gold Specie, so that you had better give notice to some of the Shepherds to pay off their deposits which they will then

have to invest in the Savings Bank, which may cause such a plethora of Cash that the Government may be compelled to accept our terms, though we understand that Mr. Dean has purchased £3000 Bills from the Crown Agents and is going to ship £1000 by the 'Orissa'.

5. We have to impart the melancholy intelligence that our Vice Chairman Emanuel Boulton Esq. died on the 16<sup>th</sup> inst. having been connected with this Company from its foundation.

6. Statement upon Accounts N° 242 dated 12<sup>th</sup> July entered an order given to Jos Lellman for £100, he sailed for Stanley in the G.V. 'Hamby' scs on 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. and the order has not been presented. Mr. Holmested wrote me on 24<sup>th</sup> June to advance John Minns £10 towards his passage to Stanley having been in his service asking me to see that it was properly expended, we have not advanced him any Cash but offered him ipassage by this vessel and have written Mr. Holmested to this effect and that he will be charged £15 for his passage. Mr. Felton has some goods on board for which we shall have to send freight & insurance account as he leaves by the Pacific G.V. 'Potosi' on 2<sup>nd</sup> prox. Mr. Noble, the Goose Green Engineer, has written <sup>me</sup> to pay £14 monthly to his Uncle Mr. Clare as per the Statement N° 243, this is declined as we must get our Advance £50 first.

7. There has unfortunately been delay in fitting out the 'Castalia' but everything is well done, she has a full supply of nautical stores for the voyages as well as provisions and carries a new suit of Sails N° 5749, 5790 to remain in Store until required. Mr. Bonner ships some Stores, he ordered a case of Tobacco as this cannot be shipped at Portsmouth we send it by the 'Orissa'. Berthorage is reduced to 97 tons - Capt. Collard is entitled to be maintained at Stanley until a second class passage <sup>home</sup> is provided for him, the same terms for Mr. C. E. Thiebert the Mate a German, the Cook and Steward and 4 AB's are engaged for two years being all

single and no payments to be made on this side. Robson sends a few goods (some not being ready) for which he pays as well as the freight £5., he talks of leaving on the 2<sup>nd</sup> prov. though he thinks well of the Hamseys' on 10<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup>. next. Most probably you will have to collect all freights on cargo for others. The Provisions are for 7 adults 90 days on a liberal scale, when orders given c<sup>m</sup>mons was not fixed still M<sup>r</sup> Yates say there will be amply sufficient for him.

Sir, As you join this Steamer at Montevideo having started by the G<sup>r</sup>. Tamar' on 8<sup>th</sup> inst. from Southampton to return to your duties at Stanley, we address this and succeeding Despatches to you and now enclose Duplicates of our two last Despatches on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> ult. and acknowledge Mr. Langdon's Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 465 of 3<sup>rd</sup> ult. which arrived on 7<sup>th</sup> instant.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 465, 1. You have done right to pay

off some of the Shepherds deposits to enable them to invest their savings in the Government Savings Bank at Stanley, we have already furnished copies of correspondence with the Colonial Office & the Crown Agents upon this business and now report that in order to assist the Government in remitting the Savings Bank funds to England for investment here, we considered it best for the interest of the Colony to oblige the Government by agreeing to purchase Bills here to the amount of £3000 (Three Thousand Pounds) for the year commencing with the Mail of 11<sup>th</sup> December next, as per statement of dates and amounts in our letter of 26<sup>th</sup> ult. to the Crown Agents, copy now enclosed; we have not yet received an answer but expect to be able to report further at last moment.

2. Par 2. We have reported the Juno's arrival to Lloyds as they have not received a List.

3. Par 3. It is unfortunate the Boiler of the Donkey Engine is so worn you ought to have said where this Engine is placed the work it performs and if really wise to repair for though you leave this town

4. Par 4. It is satisfactory to learn that the Sheep are going on so well it is however singular that Cooper's Dip fails to destroy Ticks although it has done so well with Scab, as you have made many enquiries and heard so much about Cooper's and Little's Dip when here you will be able to decide whether Little's should not be used at times, I mean their Liquid Dips as Mr. Little said it might be mixed with the Powder Dips, enclosed are reports from Little and their reduced prices.

5. Par 6. We shall apply to the Cosmos C° for a reduced rate for our people's passage from and to Monte Video but are glad to learn by Par 9 that this expense for the present season is saved.

6. Par 7. We are pleased to hear that Mr. Noble our Engineer at Goose Green is now quite satisfied with his position, let us know when he has repaid a good part of the Co° advance to him that we may begin to pay his Uncle Mr. Clare and another debt he owes here.

7. Telegram Home N° 43 arrived 14<sup>th</sup> ult. 10.13 am "Tamaero kards begging novedad" which we took to mean 10,000 yards Wool Bagging required November, we have sent out the quantity, trust it will arrive in time & regret Messrs. Hindley have been so very dilatory in making it, next year I mean to send this quantity in June or soon after to be on the safe side.

8. Mr. Bonner left on 31<sup>st</sup> ult. by the 'John Elder' the proceeds of his Wool ex 'Monna Helene' 13 Oct 88 are to be remitted to his Bank at Liverpool: Mr. Robson left by same steamer the proceeds of his Produce is to be credited him through Stanley Office. There is a further error in the 'Denderah's' 14 Sep 88 Bills of Lading the 44 bales Sheepskins having 25 bales Wool amongst them, this and

other discrepancies will be rectified by the Account Sales  
We have opened a Policy for £1000 for General Stores  
round the Islands by our Schooners or other vessel at 10/-  
per cent (Ten Shillings) amounts to be declared by first  
Mail after shipment, another £1000 to be continued as  
soon as the first is filled up, copy of Policy is enclosed.  
Mr E. F. Baillon has paid in £180.2.8 to credit of  
Baillon & Stickney for Rent of West Fox Bay to Govern-  
ment due 5 Feb 89, 2½% to Commission to be charged for  
carrying out this business.

9. We have arranged with the Flormos Steamships

We have engaged another Blacksmith John Ogilvie who  
goes out with his Wife, four children and an infant, his  
wife's sister Georgina Swankie accompanies them. Mr.

distribution at Darwin Harbour, If you learn this parcel  
is in the Office case, please give it to Mr. Frazer.

11. We have to report that the purchase of Messrs.  
Dean & Sons' Store Business and Property at Stanley & vessels

is completed, the Contract being signed yesterday of which a copy is now forwarded & we tried to prevent the 'Dennis Brundrit' going out again but could not succeed but it is arranged that on arrival at Stanley you may sell her, though if she returns for sale here the profit upon the voyage is to be divided, we must therefore avail of her voyage to ship the Machinery and as many Stores as Dean allows us space for, the Solicitors tell us we are answerable for the Insurance so a provisional Policy has been opened for Buildings £4,900 as per list herewith and Stores £8,000. We must consult with Mr. Dean when the overdue Indent arrives to send a full supply of Stores by the 'D. Brundrit' and the 'Flosmos' Steamer of 19<sup>th</sup> January next.

12. Just received the Crown Agents' Letter of yesterday, copy enclosed, accepting our offer to purchase here their Bills for £3,000 next year to enable them to obtain in England for investment the funds of the Stanley Savings Bank so this will be carried out on the dates specified in our letter of 26<sup>th</sup> ultimo - they also agree to accept our Bills at Stanley at 10<sup>4</sup>/<sub>12</sub>s for Posts & Taxes as heretofore and further Specie if necessary.

13. The S. American Miss<sup>t</sup>. Soc<sup>t</sup>. are sending four Romney Marsh Rams to improve their Wool, I have asked Mr. Frazer to look after them and depute one or two of Capt<sup>r</sup>. Packe's Shepherds to clean & attend to them for a remuneration of 10/- each man at end of voyage or such amount as you deem fit to be paid at Stanley & debited to the S. A. M. S.  
John Ogilvie's Agreement is now to be signed at Dartmouth through Collins who will send you same at Montevideo.  
W. Bischoff has just sent instructions that the Contract signed by Mr. Dean, as well as a Copy of same, is to be sent to Stanley, I was going to send the Copy only.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on the 10<sup>th</sup> ult. we acknowledge Despatch N° 466 and Mr. Langdon's letter of 11<sup>th</sup> Oct. received on the 14<sup>th</sup> ultimo.

2. N° 466, 2. We regret that the Wool Bagging is running short, Telegram Home N° 73 was received as already reported and we trust the quantity sent will be in time and sufficient: Messrs. Hindley have drawn our attention to the fact that Messrs. Dean & Sons do not use such an expensive Bagging as we do, theirs cost four pence (4<sup>3</sup>) per yard, we pay five sevenights pence ( $5\frac{7}{8}$ ) per yard, this being a great difference we appealed to the Wool Brokers if Dean's bagging brings the Wool properly and they state it does, as you will now be able to examine Messrs. Dean's books it will be proper to decide which kind to order for our next shipment, which as explained to you ought to be placed in Messrs. Hindley's hands next May or June as there is so much delay in getting our particular breadth 5<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> ins made.

3. Par 6 and 11 Oct Dr also Par 6. We approve of our people being paid off in order to invest in the Govt. Savings Bank and according to arrangements made with you here we have purchased at the Crown Agents for the Colonies a Bill on Stanley for Six Hundred Pounds, (£600) and shall continue these remittances according to our letter to the Crown Agents on 26<sup>th</sup> October last.

4. On the 29<sup>th</sup> ult. Lloyd's sent particulars of your telegram about the 'Wallis & John' brought to M. Dider by the 'Hambyes', this shows that the Mail Due on the 18<sup>th</sup> inst. cannot be delivered until the end of the month:

they also report that you are instructed to wire about vessels homeward bound as well as outward. Your Telegram Home N<sup>o</sup>. 74 "Damask" arrived on the 4<sup>th</sup> inst, at 9.50 am and was immediately sent to your wife. The Antwerp Bill of Lading included some Stores for your brother and self; You ought to have reported you were sending goods. The last Mail brought a letter dated 17 Sep last from Peter Noble our Engineer at Goose Green saying he was now contented and repaying our advance, so we have arranged to pay on his account to Messrs Garrett & Co. Four Pounds (£4) on the 15<sup>th</sup> of every month until his debt to them is settled.

Mr Henry Waldron has deferred paying his debt last month until the middle of next month, when we are to receive from Mr Spearing £869. 1. 3 for him, he leaves by this Steamer with his Brother James.

5. Report the following upon Messrs Dean's business - a detailed valuation is to be sent for the houses, shops &c insured as per list sent last Despatch amounting to £4,900, and another valuation of the Co<sup>o</sup> Houses &c to be insured, as the National Fire Office has agreed to reduce their charges. We have informed Lloyd's of the purchase telling them that Machinery was being sent out to improve & expedite Shipping repairs and have advertised this in the Shipping Gazette. The 'Dennis Brundrit' arrived 15<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>o</sup> and is now loading for Dean & ourselves, our freight on fine goods is to be 4<sup>1/2</sup> d. a ton, on rough 3<sup>1/2</sup>. I demurred to this latter but gave way afterwards as it creates the charge we shall have to make him for his Farming Stores when we are the only firm chartering vessels: she takes 20 Border Cheviot Rams chosen by Mr James Haining, A. McCalls Uncle, to be divided between us each paying half the cost and expenses - I do not see how she can start until the 21<sup>st</sup> or 22<sup>nd</sup> inst. and she may be detained until after Christmas - Mr Dean talks of getting 2 or 3 Shepherds for himself from the Isle of Harris who would look after the Rams.

The Pacific Steam Navigation Co. have transferred their Agency from George Dean to yourself; we have written the South American Missionary Society about their Agency but the Committee have not yet decided. We have to begin a monthly payment of Eight Pounds (£8) on 1<sup>st</sup> prox: to Mr. Wenster on behalf of the 'Boat Griffs', and Mr. Dean is to inform us the payments to be made to Mr. Benney. This vessel and the 'W. Menes' on 19<sup>th</sup> prox: will execute Orders 80 & 81 with exception of the page of Timber and 200 tons House Coal, and I consider we need not charter for these at present as Mr. Dean informs me he shipped 500 tons House Coal from Goole by the 'Jane Brown' on 11 Aug last though he says we ought to send out another 500 tons, as you do not approve of the Goole Coals I suppose we must charterate Newcastle and send the Timber from the best Merchant recommended to us there, we ought also to ship some Spars, what a pity it is you did not call upon Messrs R. D. Welch &c: when at Liverpool about some from Vancouver's Island, could you not arrange with their Firm at the latter place for a good selection of Spars to be left at Stanley by a vessel coming to England as such goods are now more than ever indispensable to us: we send a List of the 'D. Brundrat's' cargo as shipped by Dean and ourselves.

6. The Machinery recommended by <sup>you</sup> for the better repairing of vessels will go by the 'Dennis Brundrat', viz: Steam Engine, 100 H.P., from H. Tyler &c: and the following supplied by Messrs Rowson Drew &c: their Fan for Forge, Butterfield's Steam Hammer, Punching and Shearing Machine, Vertical Drilling Machine, Rowson's Bench Drilling Machine, and an assortment of Shafting, Pulleys &c: to be put up in the Smithy for driving above Machines, a plan with dimensions for erecting these to enable preparations to be made before vessel arrives is now sent.

7. The 'Henes's' Produce arrived here 30<sup>th</sup> ultimo  
 consisting of 84 bales Wool and 44 bales Sheepskins, the  
 former to be sold tomorrow, the latter on 13<sup>th</sup> so we shall  
 fortunately receive all proceeds within the year, unless  
 the 'Hambyses' due end of this month is bringing anything.  
 Mr. Windsor called yesterday about the S.V. 'Schleswig' going  
 out for 3,000 Live Sheep under contract by Mr. Felton to be  
 delivered by him for nine shillings (9/-) each, which Mr.  
 Windsor tells me you undertook to provide if Mr. Felton  
 failed doing so, the terms being Five Hundred Pounds  
 (£500) to be sent by Mr. Hayfson the Owner in the S.V.  
 and the balance deposited here or Banker's Guarantee given,  
 as the 'Schleswig' will soon be ready to sail they were to  
 telegraph you last night or this morning anticipating  
 that you would still be at Montevideo as the 'Ramses' was  
 two days late: they consider if these Sheep could be shipped  
 by middle or end of next month they would be in better  
 condition than later on, not being so fat and the wool  
 lighter for coming through the Tropics from the late shearing.  
 Just received letter from Messrs H.C. Langridge &c: that they  
 cabled yesterday "Inform Cobb Schleswig due Falklands  
 middle Feb<sup>r</sup>. live sheep if Cobb left cable" - it appears  
 therefore certain this business will be carried out, it is  
 stated she can make the <sup>home</sup> run in 23 or 25 days.

8. Your letter of 24<sup>th</sup> ult. at Pernambuco arrived  
 yesterday and has been attended to. In future Indents you  
 will have to state whether our or Dean's tradesmen have to be  
 employed. Herewith is our new Mail Table, several copies  
 being labelled for certain persons, some for you to distribute,  
 especially for Darwin & the Shepherds, I have sent a number  
 to Mr. Henry Waldron for the West Falklanders. We may  
 lay the Supplementary Mail on the 15<sup>th</sup> instant.

next year by the Flotemos Steamers you must remember to  
give us your anticipations of the dates for calling at  
Stanley of the extra Steamers from Valparaiso, in addition  
to our Mail Steamers on 15 Jan 12 Mch & 15 May which  
of course all bring Wool, as it may be very necessary to  
inform the Brokers of anticipated arrivals and this infor-  
-mation will also be useful for our Finance requirements.

3. By advice from Mr. Costello we are shipping a Donkey Pump to be worked by hand or steam in order to be able to attend to the Boiler should the Steam Engine not be working: he reports that a Donkey Engine was damaged at Goose Green at the explosion and suggests that if this is not totally ruined it would be wise to send it to London for repairs. We are told that the 'J. P. Smith' 772 tons Reg. which arrived at Stanley end of 1886 and is now lying there as a Hulk is a very good vessel and if not requiring too heavy repairs it might answer our

Mr. Dean has asked us to continue the payments he makes to Mr. Beuney on behalf of her Husband at Saunders Island being £45 (Fortyfive Pounds) on the 1<sup>st</sup> January and every quarter afterwards, which we shall carry out as you will receive his Wool and manage his account: he also requests us to pay Mrs. Wimber £8 (Eight Pounds) a month from 1<sup>st</sup> Jan<sup>t</sup> being half pay of her Husband Captain of the 'Orissa', this will be done: he will continue himself for the present the payments for Bertrand's & Fellows School Accounts for their children.

2. Enclosed is Copy of letter 14<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> from Mr. Pullman complaining of the bad flying of the Hides ex 'Minna Helene' 13 Oct 88, as they purchase the most of our Hides the Board wishes <sup>you</sup> to take steps to prevent such

damage to our Produce. We have paid Mr. John Bonner £2,842.8.6 for his Wool &c ex 'Minna Helene' and £300.1.6 to Mr. H. H. Cobb and same amount to Mr. Baillon on account of Speedwell Island. The Registrar General of Seamen has sent a notice requiring the number of Seamen on board the 'Hornet', as this information is for the Government Statistical Return it will be necessary for you to send by November of each year particulars of the crews of each of our Island vessels. There is now a chance that the S.V. 'Schleswig' at Hamburg may coal at the North instead of Cardiff and come on here for cargo, if this is carried out we should endeavour to ship the 200 tons Flouse Coal and the 180 tons Timber as well as some Spars if she could take them. The Bishop of the Falklands will soon have to send out materials for the Cathedral at Stanley and may ask us to provide some rough cargo if he charters a vessel. Under advice from Mr. Dean and Capt<sup>n</sup>. Thomas we have bought two Boats for the Sheep instead of building Pens on the deck as these will be valuable at Stanley for vessels having lost their boats and we should like to have your opinion for future shipments of sheep. I regret to find that number 6711 Bread Pans which you ordered for yourself has not arrived. There seems to be a good quantity of cargo for the Am<sup>n</sup>. Missionary Society and altogether there must be a very large cargo onboard.

3. 'Diamond' supplied with 200 tons Coals and proceeded, will require Coal 400 tons Steam 400 tons House - we immediately informed your Wife of your safe arrival.

Berg, Stavanger, Norway, for 480 tons Coals at 32/- per ton, vessels of our size are difficult to obtain hence the increased freight but all freights have gone up lately, she will load in the Tyne or at Blyth, M<sup>r</sup>. W. Mathewson & Son of Newcastle on Tyne will attend to her, they recommended Harton or Tynemouth at 10/- and Cowpen or Delaval at 9/- less 2½%, we have decided on the Cowpen as they report it is rather firmer for shipment and does not take up so much space, I trust she will arrive here in a few days and the loading shall be expedited as much as possible; she is owned by the same Firm as the 'Fri' sent out middle of Sept, she ought to leave the Tyne first week of next month. This Steamer has received at Newcastle 152 tons 6 cwt House Coal, Cowpen Wallsend from the Cowpen Coal C<sup>o</sup> as per Certificate of 23<sup>rd</sup> inst. Herewith: she loads here the Timber ordered some time since and Indent 82, to fill up there will be a barge alongside with 30 to 40 tons Timber of the usual sort if she can take it: also ten Rams Border Leicesters from Gardine of Lockerbie: a M<sup>r</sup> Gutherford goes out in her with 4 Rams from Wick for M<sup>r</sup> Felton and two for some one else. On the 2<sup>nd</sup> ult. we received Despatches N<sup>o</sup>s 468, 469, 470 and your letter and memorandum of 18<sup>th</sup> December 1888.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 468, 3. It is very gratifying to learn that the Lambing is so good and the animals in strong health, also that the dipping is expected to be good for we shall need a full quantity of Wool to meet all the expenses, paying off the Shepherds & the late heavy shipments of Stores.

3. N<sup>o</sup>. 469, 1. We are glad that you arrived in good health at Stanley and trust you will be able to carry out the onerous duties the late purchase of Mr. Dean's business will entail upon you and all our staff.

4. Par 4. You have done right to return the Dean Agreement which is now signed by all the Vendors, Mr. Dean has not called about it but the Board of yesterday decided that we could not move further until the report and accounts arrived of the value of the Stores &c taken over.

5. Par 7, 12. I was in hopes of reporting the charter of a vessel for the 700 tons Harris' Deep Navigation Steam Coals but the Brokers cannot obtain a vessel having had to refuse 4 of a ton, the matter will not be delayed and may send copy of charter by the Supplementary Mail - enclosed are particulars of this Coal.

John Williams, has been chartered to convey 850 tons Harris' Deep Navigation Steam Coals and the 2,000 Bricks ordered in Indent & 3, we have been obliged to give the increased freight of 3 1/2d a ton which with the extra cost of the Harris Coal 1/- a ton above the Ocean Merther will preclude them being sold to the Admiralty at the old rate, so I must call upon Mr. Collett the Director of Contracts to explain this; we have told all concerned that time is an object so trust she will sail about the 23<sup>rd</sup> instant.

2. Referring to your Notes on Stores p<sup>r</sup>. Ramses' 10 Nov 88 it has been explained by M<sup>r</sup>s. Maple &c<sup>o</sup> that the charges following the cost of the material for Curtains £4. 7. 2 in their Invoice of 17 Oct 88 are for sundries to make up the said Curtains, the same as the charges underneath the cost of Tapestry £12. 6 in the same invoice. Jervis' Sanitary C<sup>o</sup> have enquired about the sample of Sheep Dip they sent out in the 'Tembria' 22 Dec 85 and would like to receive account sale and settlement, if it cannot be used or disposed of it had better be sent back by the 'Grisa'.

3. Yesterday we received from Mr. Baker the Liquidator of the Falkland Islands Merchant C<sup>o</sup> the enclosed Affidavit to be sworn by Mr. Langdon and Copy of Printed Notices sent out in Despatch 700, 9 on 10<sup>th</sup> March 88, referred to in said Affidavit and to be signed by the Official who witnesses Mr. Langdon's signature to the Affidavit, according to copy of Mr. Baker's letter herewith, please attend to this without delay: this morning he has sent a messenger to say that he has to send to each Creditor of the

Mr. Langridge told me on 24<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>. that a Dividend would soon be paid so I wrote that day to Mr. Baker claiming for Sharpe, Fellow and Robson's Bills sent to us, Fellow's Bill £72.10.- left with us by himself and your charge for services £152.9.10 so presume they and yourself will receive notices about the Dividend.

4. Mr. Thiebert the Mate of the 'Castalia' arrived by the 'Gom Elder' which brought our Mails and came this morning for his wages we have had to pay him ten days keep at Sandy Pt. I am glad to hear him report very favorably of the 'Castalia'.

5. Regret to state that my Chart of the Falklands with all the Farms, Sections and our Fences marked on it has unaccountably disappeared, it is a great loss as it had the acreage of all the Farms and other details upon it, would it be possible for you to supply a copy if so pray oblige me without.

Sir, We enclose Duplicates of our last Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 718, 9 on the 5<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> ult. and acknowledge your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 471, 2 dated 15<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> January received on the 20<sup>th</sup> ult. and N<sup>o</sup>. 473 of 28<sup>th</sup> January received on the 1<sup>st</sup> instant.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 471, 2. We learn from Mess<sup>r</sup>s Langridge that they could not get a lower rate for insurance of Coals by the 'Jane Brown' as she was small and a low clafs, they had great doubts about taking her up but at that time small vessels were so scarce, the extra length of her voyage showed there was considerable risk about her.

3. Par 3. We have opened another Coasting Insurance Policy for £2,000, you do all that is necessary by writing the amount & details at the back of Policy.

4. Par 5. We received on 12<sup>th</sup> inst. Three Hundred Pounds from Mr James Baining for Archibald M<sup>r</sup> Call.

5. Par 7. It is unfortunate St George has not produced more young Horses we are told that it would be useless to send any one out as he ought to have exercise and a paddock where he can run about with his Mares having a shelter for cold weather, Ferguson told me the man attending him is too timid some one else ought to be appointed who would lunge him about with a rope from his headstall if he cannot be ridden for exercise, of course he must not be turned out suddenly in cold weather and the shelter ought to have a manger for oats &c as grass will not be sufficient for him, we

trust steps will be taken to get him into better condition believing him to be a good Stallion & suitable for us so that our breed of Horses may be improved.

6. Par 9. We are glad to learn that the 'Castalia' is so highly approved, the crew were selected in conjunction with Mr. Thiebert, the Mole, as Capt. Collard could not leave the vessel and there was difficulty in getting men to go in a small vessel for so long a service, I thought there might have been another hand when at Portsmouth with them but there was no chance of getting a man there. Capt. Collard returned here on 21<sup>st</sup> ult. and settled up accounts on the 26<sup>th</sup> ultimo.

7. Par 10. If the Robey Boiler which Noble reports would last another five years if retubed, is the Boiler called here the Egeria's we shipped tubes for it from Robey by the 'Dennis Brundrit' 28 Dec 88, if this is not the case let us know what is required & it shall be sent.

8. Par 15 to 18. Your reports about purchase of Dean's business are satisfactory, of course returns cannot be rapidly made up and Mr. Dean here is content to wait, he has handed several Deeds of the Land at Stanley to his Solicitors who have communicated with ours and instructions are to be sent you this Mail: you have done well to retain the principal employees and workmen as any reduction can best be made later on: we are sorry to hear some of the houses and Hulks have been neglected and need repairs this must be done in a fair manner without too much outlay: if the Steam Winch on the 'Tilton' requires the boiler to be retubed say so and on details being sent it shall attended to.

9. Par 20. Blake's transmitters for the Telephone are to be shipped at Antwerp, we trust Paterson will send full instructions.

10. Par 21. When you report that Bertrand and

Fellon have joined partnership for Farms at Roy Cove & Teal Inlet I presume the latter means a place in Port Salvador, Fellon's original Farm where he has a large acreage of land from a Chart lent me by Mr. Dean, of which I have made a copy and trust the details you can send me as asked last Mail will make it nearly as perfect as my old one.

11. N<sup>o</sup>. 472, 4. We note that future shipments of Coal must have other stores shipped with them this shall be attended to, your next Despatches will say if House Coals up to 400 tons are to be sent next May, I shall endeavour to do this from Newcastle for Wallsend Coals though we had very good recommendations for the Cowpen by the 'Ideal' on 6<sup>th</sup> ult.

12. Par 6. As you report that it would be too expensive and risky to repair the 'G. P. Smith' but suggest that we might sell her as she lies the Board leaves the matter for your decision on the understanding that on no account must she remain in Stanley Harbour as a bulk for this would interfere with our business.

13. Par 8. Unfortunately A. M<sup>c</sup>: Call's Memo giving the different Farms on which Cooper's & Little's Dips have been used does not give the numbers of the bales, Ferguson pointed out the Farms or Stations whence the sheep came for the first clipping so that presumably the first number of this shipment by the Totnes, which arrived 5<sup>th</sup> instant, may be Little's Dip and later ones Cooper's, Edenboroughs have been instructed that I am to search into the matter when their worker examines the lot and if any difference is discovered you shall be informed but I fear we shall not find any difference in the Wool: we are also to decide how heavy the bales ought to be made: Ferguson told me more Books were required for Darwin Library, a number went out lately if not for Darwin please say the sort & number to be sent, I was surprised to hear from him that the mounted

shipments for Fox Bay, Port Howard, Bill Cove, Shallow Bay,

also San Carlos presumably for Bonner, or would it be for  
Greenshields - This List has cost seven shillings it being thought  
a proper outlay to show the shipments made to West Falkland, if  
to be continued say so.

15. N<sup>o</sup> 473, 2. It is good that you have made satis-  
factory arrangements during your Camp inspection and  
we are glad to hear there will be a larger clip of Wool than  
anticipated, with respect to the weight of the bales the Brokers  
observed that extremely heavy bales might make Buyers  
think they were sandy, we are not troubled with sand so much  
as other Sheep Farmers though at times we have it and it  
would be well to know which of our districts sometimes has  
it so as to watch the prices realized by their particular wool.

16. Par 5. The List of Buildings and Values as  
purchased from Messrs. Dean & Sons has been submitted

17. Par 6. We are extremely sorry to learn that the Newspapers have not again been delivered, they are certainly posted properly here, we have complained to the Post Office, have instituted Labels to mark them more distinctively from the G.<sup>th</sup> ult. and have changed the office from Eastcheap to Gracechurch St., so we trust these alterations will conduce to regularity in future.

18. Par 10. We must leave you to deal with the 'Minna Helene's' Freight to our Clients as you deem best, as by our Memo of 11 Dec 88 we are not able to arrange it on this side.

19. Par 13. You will do quite right to leave the stocktaking to the Storekeepers as it is of paramount importance that the Farming operations should have your special attention during the shearing season.

20. Your letter of 14<sup>th</sup> Jan<sup>o</sup> arrived with Despatch, we must look after the extra freight to be obtained from Dean & Mal who charged to F.C & G. Cobb.

21. We are informed the Falkland Islands Meat Co.'s notices to their Creditors left on 9<sup>th</sup> ult. to catch the S.V. 'Galicia' at Lisbon. Mess<sup>r</sup>. Langridge sent on the

14<sup>th</sup> ult. Telegram Out N° 49 "Schleswig Vincent eleventh" to inform you that the S.V. "Schleswig" sailed from St. Vincents on the 11<sup>th</sup> ult. so that you might know when to expect her at Stanley. On the 8<sup>th</sup> inst. we received Telegram Home N° 78 - "Federal Gudrun Matzen Hamburg or bottomry" meaning that the Bdg. "Gudrun" needed repairs and that we were to arrange with the Owner Mr. Matzen to accept the Captain's drafts or Bottomry Bond must be taken, we immediately wrote Mr. C. M. Matzen who telegraphed on 11<sup>th</sup> that he would accept the Captain's drafts, we therefore sent that afternoon Telegram Out N° 50 "Fictionist Gudrun" to denote Bills could be taken in hopes there would be a vessel leaving Montevideo for Stanley before the present Steamer, as Mr. Matzen trusts there will be no delay in getting his vessel ready for sea: later on the 8<sup>th</sup> inst. Lloyd's sent copy of your telegram that the "Gudrun" had lost main topmast.

22. Being at the Admiralty lately I was telling one of the Officials about the Machinery we have lately sent out when he said it ought to be recorded in their Appendix to Dock Book, which is supplied to all vessels for the information of their Officers, and gave me the paper sent herein with Printed Headings for you to fill up & return, which had better be done at once as such information might induce Men of War to put into Stanley to get some work done.

23. We send copy of Letter from the S. American Missionary Society about their Agency at Stanley dated the 26<sup>th</sup> ult. but only received hereon the 6<sup>th</sup> inst., as it contains so many clauses and restrictions I have written them that it will have to be submitted to the Board on the 18<sup>th</sup> inst., though copy would be sent you this day. Your Mother has paid 5.10.8 for the cost of Curtains at the end of Maples' Invoice 17 Oct 88 p. Ramaes 10 Nov 88, about

which you wrote and I replied in last Despatch Par 2. We send  
List of Freights paid the last two years and the present  
to enable you to judge the rate we ought to charge our  
Clients, I believe Mr. Dean always charged 5/- and 5%  
but as we are likely to suffer opposition from the West  
could we not reduce it to 4.5/- and 5% for our clients  
retaining the 5/- & 5% for strangers.

24. N° 471, 11, N° 472, 7. When we found that  
the Steam Coals per 'Glendovey' would cost at Stanley  
close upon £3 per ton we wrote to the Admiralty on the  
12<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>o</sup>, having explained the matter to Mr. Collett, the  
Director of Navy Contracts, the day before, stating that  
we should not be able to supply H.C.M. Steamers at the  
old price of 5/- per ton and must charge 6.5/- or even 7/-

 for his Son: we are often asked for Postage Stamps please  
 send a dozen of each and the Chairman particularly wants  
 some Postal Cards. Capt. Jenkins of the Post Office has  
 just called to leave me a proof of their Mail notice dated  
 the 19<sup>th</sup> inst. which I send you to show that they have altered  
 the 2<sup>nd</sup> April to the 16<sup>th</sup> April according to a suggestion I  
 made to them. The Ducker Portable House C° whose Circu-

 for such shipments, doors, window frames &c could be obtained.  
 The 'Dennis Brundrit' is insured for £1200 against total loss  
 only and the running down clause, Lloyd's had telegram on  
 23<sup>rd</sup> ult. that she had arrived at Stanley. On 25<sup>th</sup> ult. we  
 received Telegram Home N. 79 "Visiator" about supplies of  
 Sheep to P.R. 'Lochard' on behalf of Messrs. Langridge &c - the  
 charge for Telegrams is now reduced to eight shillings a word.

4. Par 4. The Board is much interested in your  
 excellent statistics about Wool & Sheep and agree with you  
 that we must not boil down such young sheep as we have  
 been doing, we trust therefore that the stock at North Arm  
 will be increased as much as possible so that we may reap  
 the benefit of larger shipments of Wool.

5. Par 7. Further enquiries shall be made about a  
 Telephone Wire to Darwin but at present the Directors do not  
 consider they can undertake this expense.

6. Par 11. We are glad you have successfully obtained  
 so many Clients and trust your hopes about others coming  
 may be realized. Par 13. Capt. Hansen's matter as to Seal  
 fishing shall be looked into as soon as possible though I  
 fear it will be difficult to obtain a legal decision: Mr. Littlehales  
 to whom we have paid £50 for him expected to have received  
 £100 but we have declined any further payment until your  
 orders so do so - we were in hopes you would not have favored  
 C. Williams with a Bill as this enables <sup>him</sup> to draw Stores from  
 London but as <sup>you</sup> were short of Cash at that time. The  
 usual monthly Bill on the Stanley Treasury is enclosed being  
 for £400 - next month there will be two £300 on the 11<sup>th</sup> and  
 £200 on the 28<sup>th</sup>, but though obliged to fix this latter day for  
 the Mail I shall write on the 11<sup>th</sup> June as one day's delay for  
 the Kosmos Steamer at Sandy Point will enable a letter to go on.

7. Par 14. We are extremely sorry to hear that Mr.  
 M. Call of North Arm has broken his leg, pray express our

sympathy with him and hopes that he will soon get over this sad accident, it is fortunate he took out his Sister with him as he will now be properly nursed.

8. Par 16. The orders in Student 85 were immediately issued and though Easter intervenes will fortunately be ready for the 'Ramses' of 11<sup>th</sup> prox: together with some few Stores not stripped by former Steamer.

9. Par 19. As Mr. Langdon does not wish to avail of his leave of absence the Directors are willing to allow him £50 on account of his passage ticket provided he serves the eight years.

10. Par 25. This very unfortunate you did not receive Telegram Out N<sup>o</sup>. 48 with Despatches 713, 4 as Mr.

Humphreys informed us he sent it on by the S.S. 'Arancaia' which conveyed those Despatches, however the matter has doubtless been fairly settled by the 'Schleswig' receiving some Wool which of course reduces the quantity for the 'Hosmos'. They evidently have trouble to arrange departures from Valparaiso but although an extra Steamer did not call middle Feb<sup>r</sup>. the Mail boat of March, the 'Theben', took double the quantity arranged for her, still we trust they will carry out the Agreement without further trouble as it would cause great delay to have to charter at Montevideo.

11. N<sup>o</sup>. 475. We regret exceedingly that the Rev<sup>d</sup> W.G. Philip has caused you annoyance by his improper behaviour, we write him that he is to apply and attend to you as our Head Manager in every thing, when you were here last year you saw his letter and our reply about the repairs for his house, and his letter of thanks to the Directors on 11 Apr 87 and their acknowledgment was duly reported to you; there is no Agreement with him as we only undertook to carry on the arrangement made with his Predecessor the Rev<sup>d</sup> Yeoman, viz. £20 a year and provide House, Butcher's Meat, Peat Fuel and Horses, of course you will have arranged with Gov<sup>r</sup> Herr as to his extraordinary demand of 3/6<sup>d</sup> a mile for travelling expenses in performing

his duty to our people, as you say he is detested in the Camp why should not one of the Superintendents write the Board through you to this effect so that steps might be taken for his removal, are you aware how much pay is granted to him by the Free Church of Scotland? My letter to him is sent open for your perusal and delivery.

12. The Directors wish the charges and commission for the business transacted for the South American Missionary Society to be as moderate as possible, and they would like to have your ideas as to the present business with regard to Mr. Dean's Store and the prospects of the same during the year, of course no estimate can be made as to repairs and supplies to vessels which unfortunately are so rare at the present time, still when this arrives five months sales will denote whether the anticipations of a considerable profit can be realized.

13. With regard to the two Dips used on the Wool ex 'Tolmes' some names of houses on Weights ex N<sup>o</sup>. 472 enables the dip particulars in same Despatch to be picked out, Lot 417 being Little's and Lot 459 Cooper's, on examination this morning no difference could be found & they fetched the same price 8 $\frac{1}{4}$  a pound, for Report with pleasure that the sale this afternoon realized an average of 8 $\frac{3}{8}$  and we hope to post priced Catalogues tomorrow - Through the Specification coming late an altered report had to be made upon H & C 47 bales Wool which is now forwarded.

14. The General Post Office cannot discover any fault about postage of Newspapers here I believe it must occur at your end. We send a great number of our new Mail Table for Stanley and the Camp, and many labelled with Peppers names, I have also sent some to Capt<sup>r</sup>. Musgrave & others at Montevideo. The Admiralty have been thanked for the cancellation of your Coal Contract.

Should anything further transpire I shall continue this Despatch on the 18<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> for transmission through Lisbon.

On the 20<sup>th</sup> ult. we received your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 476 of 12<sup>th</sup> March, your letter and memo both dated 16<sup>th</sup> March - your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 477 of 19<sup>th</sup> March arrived on the 29<sup>th</sup> ult. - and on the 2<sup>nd</sup> instant we received your Darwin letter of 23<sup>rd</sup> March.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 476, 8. You complain very much about our shipping goods by the G.V. 'Schleswig' but we did right to support such an experiment as getting live Sheep from the Falklands and though Timber might have been a little cheaper by sailing vessel if we had had sufficient to fill one, which was not the case, we got the extra at the lower rate of £5/- and all our fine goods at more than a £1 less than by the F. Hosmos C.; you make a great deal of alleged damage to the Timber, which of course is very unfortunate and annoying, but after all tone it down to the small demand of about £35, which Mfrs. Langridge & C. have not yet been able to settle by arbitration as by the Agreement signed by yourself and Capt. Otto Kohn on the 18<sup>th</sup> March.

3. Par 10. The matter of the Spirit License can only be settled in Stanley and the Directors consider that if necessary it will be sufficient to confine the sale of Spirits to one Store only, whichever you deem the best.

4. Par 13. The Hydraulic Wool Press has been ordered from H. Tyler & C. for Mfrs. Sharp & Smith to be shipped by the G.V. 'Letos' of 20<sup>th</sup> July, it was mopped whether an iron or steel Cylinder should be provided

as there have been accidents with the former a Steel one is ordered though the extra expense will be £18.

5. Par 15, 16. All business with the Rev? Philip is to be settled by yourself as per our last Despt<sup>r</sup>. par 11.

6. Par 19. Respected some of Dean's invoices would be cheaper than ours as he orders larger quantities but are the stores as good, we shall of course order from the Firms you think best, some of the present shipment is from Cook, Foster, Thurbers who supplied Dean.

7. Par 29. The Board have agreed with the South American Missionary Society to draw upon them at 60 d<sup>s</sup> for the Account £272. 10. 2 you have sent, in future the drafts on them are to be at 90 d<sup>s</sup> and interest @ 3% is to be charged.

8. Par 33. This unfortunate there is so much trouble about the Creditors of the Falkland Islands Meat C°, we wrote Mr. Baker the Liquidator who has sent copy of his Solicitor's, Druces & Atlee, letter of 30 Apr 89, now enclosed, with another Affidavit so we trust Mr. Langdon will be able to attend to this and close the matter.

9. Par 34. The S.V. 'Theben' delivered in the Tilbury Docks on 29<sup>th</sup> ult. 983 bales Wool which were sold on 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. at lower rates unfortunately than the former sale on 16<sup>th</sup> ult. of the late series - the bale ~~F~~<sup>a</sup> 54 mentioned in your Memo of 16<sup>th</sup> March as from Noble, our Engineer at Goose Green proved to be Wool and has been sold as being the Co's. produce. James Great our Mason arrived in her, has gone to Dumfries and will leave with his wife by the S.V. 'Goto' on 20<sup>th</sup> July - also Mr. M<sup>r</sup> Earby with two children - Wm Lynch wife have engaged for Mr. Anson to go out by the September Mail, I write Mr. Anson with copy of Agreement. Mr. Benney wrote me on 14<sup>th</sup> March last to increase his Wife's quarterly payments to £50 which will commence on 1<sup>st</sup> July next.

10. Par 39. We regret you have trouble with the Government about the Powder Magazine, the damaged tin brought by the 'Schleswig' was submitted to M<sup>r</sup> Pigeon &c whose letter of 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. now enclosed proves that the Magazine provided by the Government damages our property, it will therefore be necessary for you to insist upon it being put into a proper state for storing Gunpowder.

11. N<sup>o</sup> 477, 2. The Gr. 'Schleswig' delivered at Deptford on the evening of the 27<sup>th</sup> ult. 2,062 Live Sheep having received 2,300 from Mr. Felton at Port Salvador, they were fine framed animals but being in poor condition did not realize more than 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  to 3 $\frac{1}{2}$  each so that there is a heavy loss on the transaction, she ought to have had a clean Bill of Health from the Falklands so that they might have been landed elsewhere and fed up for a short time. Mess<sup>r</sup>. Gammie & Garysen &c<sup>o</sup> accepted the draft £133. 5. 1 after some demur as they assert there is a serious error in the charge for Water, for they say you told them it would be 5/- a ton instead of the 7/6<sup>th</sup> a ton charged and that the quantity delivered was only 190 tons not 200 tons as charged, as per enclosed letter from them dated 9<sup>th</sup> inst., we therefore consider it will be the duty of the C<sup>o</sup> to apply to the Government for a reduction of their charge and we trust you will be able to obtain the £24. 10.- as stated.

12. Part 4. The Crockery for your house having to be specially made to pattern could not be ready before the present shipment by this Steamer.

13. Dr of 23 Mch 89. As the Leather is wanted for the Hydraulic Rams we immediately telegraphed the makers and fortunately it is supplied for present Steamer. We are glad to hear that all matters in the Camps are progressing favorably - 483 bales D.H. Wool have been received, 104 bales P. Totnes' 5 Mch, 379 bales P. Sheben 29 Ap, and it has not been reported that there were two bales of the same number. Mr. Mortimore has had a good report of the Wolseley Sheep Shearing Machine C<sup>o</sup> at Melbourne and have written for full particulars and requested that we may be appointed Agents for the Falklands, Tierra del Fuego and Southern part of Argentine Republic from River Chupat to the Straits of Magellan, we understand Agents are to be appointed for Buenos Ayres & Montevideo we may order some of the Machines for our own use.

14. We have not been able to find the old papers about the transactions with the Government upon the ~~for~~<sup>natura</sup> question which occurred so very many years ago so I proposed to the Chairman to obtain a legal opinion upon the matter, as you state Capt<sup>r</sup>. Hansen is willing to pay for this, but he observed that any opinion from this side must be ruled by the Law Officers at the Colony, still I consider it will be best to consult our Solicitors who will decide whether a Barrister's opinion should be obtained.

15. Enclosed is correspondence with Harper's Bridge Co: being Estimate &c. of 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. your reply and instructions could be received 30<sup>th</sup> July, but not until 27<sup>th</sup> Aug: if you have to procure plan and section of shores but even then it could be prepared for the 'Orissa' leaving middle of Sept<sup>r</sup>. next.

16. On the 2<sup>nd</sup> inst. I received a letter dated the 25<sup>th</sup> March last from Mr<sup>r</sup>. G. Turner Secy. of The Stanley Assembly Rooms Company Limited, asking me to obtain Estimates for their building upon F. Morton & Co: Estimate & Plan dated 23 Nov 88, and having obtained permission from the Board to attend to this business I immediately wrote for estimates and now report to Mr<sup>r</sup>. Turner the course I advise being of opinion that Rowson's estimate ought to be accepted, they hold this over to middle of next month as your Despatch due to June may write about it.

17. You have not reported when the Sheepshirts went to River Plate Near C: at Buenos Ayres, nor the amount of same, we have asked Humphreys to attend to this and remit us. Cookson & Co: could not execute all their order in time for this Steamer, their explanation is enclosed; Foster Porter & Co: could not supply the Lace ordered. The monthly remittance on the Stanley Treasury is £300 a Bill being enclosed. I propose shipping the Assembly Room by the 'Orissa' middle of Sept<sup>r</sup>. next.

Enclosing Duplicate of our last on the 11<sup>th</sup> instant we acknowledge your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 478 of 17<sup>th</sup> April which arrived on the 25<sup>th</sup> inst. with your letter of 20<sup>th</sup> April by the 'John Elder' she brought your Brother George and family, and Mr. Bowner and Mr. Robson.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 478, s. Mr. Felton's claim on M<sup>r</sup>. Gamman Hayffsen H.C. for short number of Sheep taken by the 'Schleswig' is not sent, M<sup>r</sup>. Dean has not handed us the £850 he received from Gamman H.C. on behalf of Felton. on receipt of same, as M<sup>r</sup>. Dean may call this morning, we will pay Gamman £328.8.9 as ft. Statement upon Accounts N<sup>o</sup>. 261.

3. Pars 2, 3, 4. We are glad to hear Camp matters are progressing favorably and that M<sup>r</sup>. M<sup>r</sup>. Call's broken leg is getting well and his health better. The 'Theben' 29 Ap 89 brought two bales Darwin Harbour Wool both numbered 196 which were sold on 3<sup>rd</sup> inst., one weighing cwt. 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> the other 6.7. It is unfortunate the Tallow Works at Goose Green were stopped for want of water, the reservoir must therefore be enlarged & perhaps another one made.

4. Pars 5, 11, 20. We can best be guided as to Sheep Dips by our Superintendents, if they prefer different Dips let them use them until you find which particular Dip turns out best, though we believe the care and mode of application has a great influence on the results of all dips. Though M<sup>r</sup>. Cooper charge us 4<sup>2</sup>/<sub>6</sub> for their Sheep Dip they allow 5 per cent for Cash which brings it down to 4/- the price they get from the Agents of the West Falklands, as they make a reduction to them we shall as the largest users of their dip apply for a lower price before we give another order. You justly observe Armstrong's assertion that a trout passed

through Cooper's Dip without harm is difficult to believe.

5. Par 7. It is unfortunate the weight of Tallow per Sheep for last year turns out so low, the Brokers say that the London weights may be relied on, as great care is taken to have these correct; we have not heard that the casks have leaked so must hope for better returns in future.

6. Par 8. The Directors quite agree with your suggestion to improve Dr. Dale's House at Darwin and make him as comfortable as possible, for we consider he has the Company's interest at heart.

7. Par 14. The Board are willing to grant Cameron & Greenshields the same advantages Messrs Hoare & C. give them in Interest provided their Wool is consigned to us; you are quite right as to the risk they run in allowing their Cash to remain with Brokers, who are wrong in receiving direct consignments; any inducement you hold out to obtain these Clients shall receive our best attention - can you learn whether Messrs Hoare charge more than  $\frac{1}{2}$  to Brokerage to compensate for the interest they allow: They have this day paid us a cheque for John Waldron's Bill £1089. 19. 4 which he asked us to renew, which we wrote him should be done if he handed us the B/L of his Wool expected pt. St. Grandholm, this was not answered, and Hoare wrote they would meet the Bill.

8. Par 16. Respecting the damaged Gunpowder we must forward Capt. Bigge's report to Riga and if they can prove that their Gunpowder is properly packed we must then apply to the Colonial Office for compensation and that the Magazine may be put into proper order.

9. Par 17. We shall carry out your wish to receive every Mail Six Hundred Pounds through the Stanley Treasury by obtaining from the Crown Agents another Bill for £400, in addition to the £200 Bill now enclosed, so as to forward it by the Supplementary Mail on 1<sup>st</sup> prox:

10. Par 21. The question of Commission upon Mr. Bonner's Wool is to be decided at our next Board on 3<sup>rd</sup> prox: and I shall therefore endeavour to get the Post Office to make up a bag for the Gv. 'Cruba' on the 11<sup>th</sup> prox: as a little speed of the Pacific Gv. to Sandy Point and a little delay of the Hormos Gv. from Valparaiso

would enable it to be delivered with this Mail: Messrs. Spearing & Waldron are certainly promising great things and reducing fair profits too much; still we must compete with them if possible - we are not aware whether they have a large capital but as the Waldrons have always had Cash for any new business we suppose they will be well supported & thus run many risks.

11. Par 24. The Stanley Assembly Room was reported in our last; as you confirm Mr. G. Turner's application to me, I shall now order Messrs. Rowson Drew &c. to commence the building they contracted to prepare for £365 so as to ship it by the 'Orissa' next September.

12. Par 25. We are sorry you are troubled with another complaint of the Rev. W. H. Philip not attending to his duties, our two last Despatches left such matters entirely in your hands as we cannot move in the matter with the Free Church of Scotland a Memorial had better be got up by our people for his removal and appointment of a successor which they can forward direct to Edinburgh or we will do so if sent through you - There is no record here of a written Agreement with him, so you had better demand a copy of the paper he talks of; with respect to his duties we have always considered he engaged to carry out the usual clerical duties - have you not a record of the Rev. Yeoman's Agreement, we will ask the Free Church of Scotland at Edinburgh for particulars of their Agreement and arrangements with the Rev. Philip.

13. Par 26, 28. Every endeavour will be made to get slide valves & rods for Mr Britain's Steamwinch for the next shipment as well as a Tyren or steam whistle for the 'Lifie'.

14. Par 29. The Board agrees with you that Mr. Langdon ought not to accept the American Vice Consulship offered to him by Mr. Lasar.

15. We draw your attention to a Question in the House of Commons on 14<sup>th</sup> inst., reported in the Times of 15<sup>th</sup>, respecting Govr. Kerr's management not being approved by the Colonists, and his quarrel with Dr. F. Hamilton, we gave information on various points to our Member of Parliament, Alfred Laffone Esq, but he decided that he could hardly take any action in the matter.

16. As we cannot do anything on this side respecting the Government Leases of Sections 24 and 25 you had better accept the terms they offer if beneficial to the Company.

17. Enclosed is correspondence with Mr. W. F. Robinson about Stanley Church the Directors being quite willing to assist the building as much as possible, & was in hopes the Archdeacon's full details, plans &c would have arrived for this Mail, for before promising anything <sup>we</sup> have full explanations.

18. Mess<sup>r</sup>. Stephenson write us that Dean was charged same price as ourselves, viz: 11/- p. cut for Extra Navy Biscuit by the D. Brundrit 28 Dec 88. Enclosed is Rownson Drew & Co's letter 16<sup>th</sup> about their willingness to tender for Stores at lower prices, they having always sent the best. We send Thomas' Steamers Fahrplan and Mail Service Tables to next November, and our present Mail Table with future Mails out & home up to November. By Letter from Capt. Sir, We wrote the Crown Agents for the Colonies on the 28<sup>th</sup> ult. for a £400 Bill on the Stanley Treasury to make up the £600 you asked for by every Mail, telling them that this would be the amount we should remit by every monthly future Mail, they replied on 30<sup>th</sup> ult., as per Copy enclosed, that they would grant £400 Bill for present Mail but could not grant more for succeeding Mails than the amounts already sanctioned by the Governor, should it be necessary to make higher remittances in future you will have to arrange with the Stanley Government for this purpose.

2. Mr. Dean informs us that he has already paid Messrs. Gamman Haynes &c the £333.8.9 which you ask us to pay them for Mr. Felton by Statement upon Accounts N<sup>o</sup>. 261, also an amount to Langridge &c, the Balance of the £850 being the £15.10.3 he handed us on 4<sup>th</sup> ult. on account of Mr. Felton, we are not able to enter into the £5 entered as less Pilotage.

3. Messrs. Bompas Bischoff &c our Solicitors cannot obtain a proper legal opinion upon Capt. Hansen's matter of the Seals upon his land until they have a Copy of the Government Lease of the Islands he rents, this had better be forwarded, also a Copy of the usual Lease under which we and other Sheep Farmers rent Land, this has been asked for before.

4. Messrs. Cory Bros. &c have asked the price of 75,000 tons Steam Coals for a Steamer to call at Stanley we have told them it cannot be less than Sixty Shillings (6/-), they have not yet replied; we have asked the Post Office to make up a Bag for the Pacific P. G. Bond Elder on the 11<sup>th</sup> inst. as it might reach you with this: you report there are 32 bales Wool \*\*, this mark is not entered on the List of Marks you returned in N<sup>o</sup>. 476, please let us know whose mark it is.

Sir, On hopes of this going on with the 'Galicia's' last two Despatches we report that the Crown Agents letter of 8<sup>th</sup> instant received this morning states that they can sell us drafts on the Stanley <sup>Treasury</sup> for £600 by each Mail Out, we shall therefore carry out your wishes by remitting £600 each month.

2. The Board have decided that Mr. Bouner's Commission may be reduced to One per cent (1%) if perfectly safe & doing a fair proportion of business with the C° - They also considered it would be best to leave all arrangements for Banking business with our Clients and others in your hands so that you may carry out such matters as you think best for us. 2. N<sup>o</sup>. 480 para 1. The Board were going to ask for the cost of Little's & Cooper's Dip but as you now report the latter so much cheaper we must confine ourselves to it and have therefore entered into an arrangement with Messrs. W<sup>m</sup> Cooper & Nephews to pay them Two Pounds (£2) a case net in consideration of our pushing their Dip with other Sheep Farmers, and if they consign to us, the price is to be £ 2. 2. 6 a case with a discount of 3 3/4% for Cash at 3 months, 2 1/2% at 6 months and 1 1/4% at 9 months, and the Board increased the quantity on Indent 89 to 100 cases for ourselves and 100 cases upon consignment, and reduced Little's Dip to 1,000 gallons which however will almost be rendered prohibitive through the increased cost demanded by the Kosmos C° in freight at 55/- £. ton and each drum to be packed in a strong case though only carried on deck, with regard to these latter extra expenses we are entirely powerless but fear the Client ordering this Dip will be much annoyed. Messrs. M<sup>c</sup> Dougall Brothers have been paid £ 41. 13. 4 for the 50 drums Cold Water Dip P. G. T. Selembria 16 Nov 86 according to your letter of 11 Mar 87 to them & they will feel obliged by Account Sales of the 50 drums Hot Water Dip which you were to sell for them.

Meat Co. must doubtless be further delayed, we trust however you will be able to satisfy the Liquidator on the subject and the Directors grant you permission to make your own arrangements and charges for carrying out any business for the Meat Co.

5. Par 18. The Gudrun's Bill is accepted, there was a report that she had put into Montevideo with cargo shifted and Mr. August Bolten, Admiraltätsstrasse 33, 34, Hamburg, has asked for the Protest and Valuation of the Ships as they are not among the accounts forwarded to him by Capt N<sup>m</sup>. Prehn, we replied we would write you about this if left at Stanley you might forward these documents to him direct.

6. Par 24. Herr is giving so much trouble by his improper behaviour, we wrote the Colonial Secretary Lord Knutsford on the 2<sup>nd</sup> inst. to support your complaints and Memorial, and you will see by the Times of 13<sup>th</sup> that on the 12<sup>th</sup> Mr. Mac Neill again asked questions in the House of Commons, Mr. Alfred Lipton M.P. called here on the subject received copy of this Paragraph, your Memorial and other papers and was to call upon Baron de Worms and Mr. Wingfield, he said he believed the Governor's abolition of the Coronership would not be allowed and he will inform the authorities that Govt. Herr is not fitted for the post he fills.

19. On the 6<sup>th</sup> inst. I am glad to learn you have succeeded so well with some of the West Falklanders, the whole business is lucidly explained and the Directors will doubtless support all your proposals, one of the chief difficulties will be the chartering small suitable vessels here as freights are up and the difficulty of filling them if they stow more than anticipated with useful saleable Stores, as we fear that the 'Briza' will not be able to carry all the goods ordered.

Enclosing Duplicate of our last on the 20<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> which just acknowledged arrival of your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 481 and 482, we now report arrival on 29<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> of N<sup>o</sup>. 483 in duplicate and N<sup>o</sup>. 484 of 24<sup>th</sup> June with Enclosures correct.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 481, 11. The Directors are quite willing to take up the Clients you mention and any other Sheep Farmers you recommend as they leave the whole business in your hands having every confidence it will be your endeavour to increase the Company's business with safety : respecting the Farmer's Accounts due J. M. Dean & Sons on 1<sup>st</sup> July 89 £2367. 3. 7 we presume it will be proper to take them over except T. Cansen's 3946. 18. - which had better remain until you know more about his position and likelihood of paying up, though Mr. Dean says we might take a Mortgage on his property at a good rate of interest, we wish therefore your further advice upon this debt.

3. Par 13. You must arrange in the best way possible the Land at Fairy Cove and we learn from Mr. Staude <sup>this morn.</sup> that the Governor is coming home with his family in the G<sup>r</sup>. Denderah, which brings about 1,000 bales of Wool for us & is due from 10 to 15 prox<sup>r</sup>, we trust you have brought him to terms before leaving the Colony - we have not had any application from the Colonial Office about this Land.

4. Par 19. I am doing my utmost to get the Assembly Room off by the G<sup>r</sup>. 'Pentaur' of 14<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>r</sup> as the Cosmos E<sup>c</sup> have kindly reduced the freight upon it, there has unfortunately been delay at Bristol but I have now insisted this day that the inspection must be on 20<sup>th</sup> inst. as the Cosmos require it on 26<sup>th</sup> inst.

5. Par 25. The Board cannot undertake at present to erect Refrigerating Stores at Goose Green, though some think it may be necessary in a year or two, then others assert that we should never get Steamers to call for Mutton and then the result would be for us to institute a Steamer at a great expense and risk, thus as matters stand at present this business must remain in abeyance.

6. Par 27. We infer you would prefer a more working Captain for the 'Orissa' than Capt<sup>n</sup> Winkler and concluded you would instruct us whether to change or not in her Despatch but by 484,13 you have not written one, we must therefore be decided by his behaviour when here.

7. N<sup>o</sup>. 482, 4. The Directors carefully considered your proposal to contract to carry Stickney's Wool for five years and though averse to making such long arrangements they agree to your proposal as you recommend it so strongly and state that you will continue at your post to carry it out, I am therefore ordered to telegraph "Corballis" on the 16<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>d</sup> to catch the last Mail at Montevideo and trust your strong measures will prevent the opposition of Townsend Bro<sup>s</sup> being continued, as they will perceive that you are equal or even more than equal to them in every way.

8. N<sup>o</sup>. 484. We have already expressed our great regret at the unfortunate death of our Clerk Mr. Langdon and quite agree with you that his funeral should be at the Co<sup>t</sup>. expence: we have already advised the appointment of Mr. Andrew E. Baillon and now enclose his Agreement dated 30<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>m</sup>. he having given Security for One Thousand Pounds (£1,000) and received an Advance of Fifty Pounds (£50) - he has asked us to pay some Insurance next Nov<sup>r</sup> and a couple small amounts now - at the last moment we decided to grant him first class passages for himself and wife for which he is very grateful and the Directors having had two interviews with him believe he will prove a good & valuable servant, the

Stanley and London Accounts have been explained to him and I took him to Lloyd's & showed all arrangements there.

9. Par 6. As Typhoid Fever has been prevalent lately you must urge the Government to take strong measures to improve the drainage of Stanley, we cannot assist in this here though willing to move in any way desired, and of course the C: is prepared to pay any expense reasonably with the inhabitants.

10. Par 8. We send Mr. Doxat's explanations upon the terms Dingy and Frothy as applied to our Wool.

11. Par 12. As you have not sent the required dimensions of the Banks &c: about the erection of Harper's Bridge and say that it ought to go next month to enable it to be erected during the dull season, I think it will be better to defer it until next year unless you write for it to be shipped by any special opportunity.

Your letter of 24<sup>th</sup> June has been attended to.

12. The S.S. 'Harmak' 13 July 89 had on Bill of Lading 1300 bales Wool, these prove to be 99 bales Wool and 1 bale Sheepskins. The 'Dennis Brundrett' arrived 22<sup>nd</sup> ult. with cargo in good order, there are about 20 tons Manganese on board which was not reported, Mr. Dean has to dispose of it - she is up for sale but the highest offer is only £850 though she must be sold, it will be necessary for you to apply at Stanley for her Register to be changed to London as soon as possible as we shall have to give a guarantee to the purchaser that this will be done. Capt<sup>n</sup>. Thomas has not yet told me what he means to do though of course we have given him notice that his services will not be required when the vessel is ready for sale.

13. At 8.15 am this morning we received Telegram Home N<sup>o</sup>. 81 "Fothered Fotherfordshire Myers Liverpool" meaning Fotherfordshire here damaged arrange credit with owners Myers of Liverpool reply need not be tele-

graphed back, I immediately wired Mess<sup>rs</sup> W. J. Myers Son & Co. at Liverpool and received Telegram that they would accept the Captain's drafts, so this is all right and I hope it will prove a good business for the C. Lloyds sent particulars of your telegram to them about her damages.

14. Mr. Bonner states that his Stores will be in time if delivered at San Carlos beginning of December so they can go by the 'Orissa', together with Bertrands, Gobinsted's, Blake's Machinery Stores, Baillon & Wickney's, you have not told us what is to be sent for ballast.

Your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 485 of 15<sup>th</sup> July and N<sup>o</sup>. 486 of 30<sup>th</sup> July arrived on the 29<sup>th</sup> ult. with all Enclosures in order, and we now hand you Duplicate of our last Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 727 dated 6<sup>th</sup> ultimo.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 485, 2. The 'Orissa' arrived 28<sup>th</sup> ult. with

all her cargo in order, there has been delay in discharging her through the Strike of the Dock Labourers, she is now recoppered, the rudder &c: repaired and ready to load next week if the men will work and we shall get her off as soon as possible stowing the different Farmers stores as you suggest, we shall have to send Invoice for each without the Discount allowed, of which an account must be sent after the payments are made, could you not obtain for an example one of Townsend & Spearings Accounts showing how the discount and expenses are entered, the freight can hardly be calculated until after her departure though it shall be done if possible - we cannot put the 20 tons Coals on board for Weddell Island so you must put this in bags (which Mr. Dean says he sent out lately) from the 'Odeals' lot so that they can be shipped at Stanley. As you did not reply to a former Despatch about another Captain there was no time to look for some one so Capt<sup>n</sup>. Wimber is continued for the present voyage, you are more likely to find some one acquainted with the islands than we are though if it will be really necessary to change let us know in time to look out for some one: Capt<sup>n</sup>. Wimber has asked permission to take out his wife which is to be submitted to the next Board. The 'Grandholm' Steamer arrived on 27<sup>th</sup> July with Wool and Shapokins for Holmested & Blake and Bonner, unfortunately the Wool Sales are postponed to 24<sup>th</sup> inst. through the Strike of Dockmen.

3. Par 5. As your further advices state that Mr. Langdon will leave the Colony we anticipate her departure will be within six months of her Husband's death so that she and the family will be entitled to a free passage to England, for as Mr. & Mrs. Baillon would arrive 15<sup>th</sup> of this month she would <sup>have</sup> to vacate the Clerk's house and must arrange to leave by the Flosmos Steamer of 15<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup>, the Directors are prepared to behave liberally towards her on hearing what concessions you have granted her - her letter mentioned in your next Despatch appeals to the Board and myself for assistance and advice, I reply we shall do the best possible for her on arrival and have mentioned above return.

4. Par 6. We regret to hear that Scab is so bad on the West and have attended to the orders for Cooper's & Little's Dips and the ingredients at Par 40 for Mr. Blake, he has written to Capt<sup>r</sup>. Cooper about their Dips not curing Scab, which Mr. Cooper showed me two days since and their reply stating they would send out a traveller to superintend dipping, explain matters & prove their dip to be superior, they will use their best endeavours to start him by the 1<sup>st</sup> Oct<sup>r</sup> Mail so you ought to send introductions for him at Sandy Point as he must remain there 8 or 9 days and could instruct the Sheep Farmers established there from the Falklands - he will arrive at an excellent season to superintend our dipping and then proceed to the West so as to leave 15 Jan<sup>u</sup> next for Montevideo and Buenos Ayres.

5. Par 7. It is most unfortunate the boiler will not do for our Blacksmith's Shop Machinery, I wired the Flosmos C° to obtain one for this Steamer but they could not so we have ordered Rownson to look out for a second hand Boiler which we shall ship by a vessel soon after the Orissa, for there is such a quantity of rough stuff that we must charter and may select the 'Dennis Brundrit', which has been sold to Capt<sup>r</sup>. Thomas for £900, as he will accept a low rate to enable him to return to Stanley and settle up his affairs.

6. Par 8. Your observations upon the proposed vessel for the Govt. Pilot at Stanley are correct but we cannot do anything here to prevent this unnecessary expense for the Governor purchased at Dartmouth on landing there ex 'Denderah' on 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. the Yacht 'Hadasah' 34 tons Reg. 44 tons Builder's measurement built by Ratsey at Cowes 1858 for something over £ 300 I believe but shall endeavour to send further particulars from Dartmouth having to do there about our numerous Passengers - Steel could not start by the 'Menes' of 20 July, through serious illness - the Government are sending Miss Sarah Preston as Nurse in cases of severe illness and have actually granted her a 1<sup>st</sup> class passage, she has been Nurse at the London Hospital. Robson's son & Hansen's son go out, also Mr. & Mrs. Lynch servants for Mr. Anson.

7. Par 12. Fellon's order for 'Orissa' will be 8 to 9 tons if not more with Pearson's goods - you do not mention the vessel conveying his bale of Black Wool, there is one from the 'L. Brundrit' claimed by Messrs Robert Houston & Sons 28 West Blackhall St., Greenock, who state that Mr. E. Fellon has written them about <sup>some</sup> and that I am to pay all expenses, the bale has upon it Robert H & Sons Greenock, so when the Strike is over I must send it on.

8. Par 41. Mr. Dean has allowed £ 300 upon the line Spirits Wine & Beer 2343.19.3 in Summary of Stock of Stores 12463.3.7 ex N<sup>o</sup>. 474, and it is deducted from the Farmer's Accounts £ 7367.3.7 ex N<sup>o</sup>. 481 together with Hansen's Acc<sup>t</sup> 3946.18.7 which the Board cannot take over pending your report on same - Petaluga's Mortgage to Dean is to remain with Dean at present.

9. N<sup>o</sup>. 486, 3. Thanks for the Copy of Government Lease Section 24 but it is not fully worded to instruct Bompas Bischoff &c as to the Lease granted Capt. Hansen for Carcass & other Islands with respect to his claim to hunt & catch Seals on them, could you not send a full old Lease or trust us with the real Lease he has.

10. N<sup>o</sup>. 485, 15. Frost is prevented through want of Hemp in consequence of the Dock Strike preparing the twine required for the Wool fleeces, so I ordered them to send to Dartmouth 3 cwt Twine they told me they are making for us, this now proves to be for Bertrand and is countermanded unless they can make more for Bertrand for the 'Orissa' in a week's time. <sup>This can be done.</sup> I have the pleasure of reporting that the Kosmos C. have agreed to our proposal for a new Contract for Wool to London next season and have accepted 30/- (Thirty shillings) for a minimum of 4,000 bales maximum 6,000 bales, and we may ship by any vessel at any time any beyond the 4,000 bales, we trust this will be successfully carried out by means of the West and other clients Wool.

We sent Telegram Out N<sup>o</sup>. 52 on 16<sup>th</sup> ult. "Corballis" venable you to enter into a five year's Contract with Stickney & others for their Wool to London.

11. Mess<sup>r</sup>. Davies Turner & C<sup>o</sup> have asked <sup>up</sup> to collect some freight on Goods sent to G. Turner & R. Blake £4.5.6 through Wehrhahn & C<sup>o</sup> Sandy Point, the particulars being given on four accounts herewith. Two of Wilkins' Goods are to go in the 'Orissa'. When at Bristol for the Assembly Room I called by Mr. Dean's request at Charles Wills & C<sup>o</sup>, Clothiers, 39 Victoria Street, respecting Clothing taken out by George Dean, they have sent a parcel of patterns which will be sent on from Dartmouth, they being ordered to send particulars there on Monday Morning, you will be able to decide if further Clothing is to be ordered from them. Mess<sup>r</sup>. A. Rimmer & C<sup>o</sup> 2 Exchange St. East, Liverpool, have enquired about the "Steelfield" if she enters Stanley send full particulars.

Robson's bale Woolpacks N<sup>o</sup>. 8,165 is to be charged freight & insurance having paid Hindley, his son Lionel goes out by this Steamer. Mr. Blake has sent £25 for his daughter Florence please pay it over.

12. The Stanley Assembly Room is shipped by the Steamer I write Mr. G. Turner with Cargo Book, through coming from Bristol the freight from London to Hamburg is saved so we have done very well for the C<sup>o</sup>, my expenses to Bristol are not charged, if you consider this C<sup>o</sup> is entitled to a Commission you can charge it, I have taken great interest in the matter for the improvement of Stanley. We send our new Mail Table of 12<sup>th</sup> inst.

Gir, We enclose Duplicate of our last dated 14<sup>th</sup> ult. and have not received any communication from you since that date.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 485, 15. Our Wool Brokers state that buyers strongly object to Wool fleeces being tied up with string as some of it gets among the Wool and will not take the dye the same as the Wool, so the Board countermanded this order with Frost and as the bale of Twine prepared for Bertrand's order per 'Orissa' could not be found at Dartmouth to go on by the 'Pentaur' on 14<sup>th</sup> ult. it will be returned here to go by the 'Dennis & Brundrit', as Frost made another lot now going to Bertrand by the 'Orissa'. I found that Mr. & Mrs. Lynch, passengers of 'Pentaur' had left three boxes Private Effects. I write him that they will be sent on by the S.W. 'Osiris' of 9<sup>th</sup> proximo.

3. Par 4. The Board decided that Mr. C. M. Dean and yourself were to arrange about the Beer and should any prove so sour as to be sold at a loss certificate is to be sent for claim on the Brewers. I have settled about the two bales Wool for J. G. Fellon and A. E. Fellon mentioned at Par 12 & 28 by sending them to the manufacturers in the North as ordered.

4. We learn from Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Vorwerk Bros. &c. that they sent Samples of German Beer with their last goods by the S.W. 'Pentaur' and obtained a reduced freight on these Stores as well as the reduced freight 3/- per cubic metre upon the Stanley Assembly Room, though I can hardly believe this as I applied to Mr. Stande myself the granted it, still they may have used their influence, they now ask if they may send other Stores so I write them they had

better send you particulars & prices and you will decide.

5. Mess<sup>r</sup>. Gamman Hayfson &c: will pay the £5 for G.W. Schleswig's pilotage but they object to the claim £6. 4. 9 for Telegram never received and wrote you on 14<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> for particulars of same, also stating that Mr. J. J. Fellow had kept Ten Romney Marsh Ram Lambs ex 'Schleswig' valued at £120, as Mr. Fellow has to remit them this amount our account could be deducted from it if there is any difficulty as to the transmission of this Telegram.

6. We have sent our Mail Table, Card X: to the 'Beagle' Capt<sup>r</sup>. Gumpage fitting out for the Montevidean Station, and the 'Nymph' fitting out for the Pacific - also the German Man of War 'Ariadne' at Montevideo as the German Consul at Dartmouth told me she wanted these. You will see by the 'Times' that Mr. C.M. Dean is appointed Danish Consul for the Falkland Islands.

7. We enclose the usual £600 Bill on the Stanley Treasury and the Crown Agents letter of 24<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> stating that these remittances cannot be continued after the end of this year, our reply of 28<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> stated this would be reported to you but answer could not be received until 17<sup>th</sup> December, we trust you will be able by that time to make favorable arrangements for your supply of Cash.

8. James Steel our Stonemason &c: last Steamer has doubtless reported that when at Dartmouth he courted a Miss Harriet R. Coish who agreed to go out and marry him as she bears a very good character and is a suitable person for his wife it is arranged that she leaves Dartmouth by the Steamer of 18<sup>th</sup> Jan<sup>r</sup> next, we advancing her passage money and any moderate expenses, please therefore bear this mind with reference to James Steel's wages.

9. After many enquiries we learn that the three Guanaco Skins upon the Manifest and Bill of Lading of the Dennis Brundrit dated 30<sup>th</sup> April last have not been found but the 272 Hides on same B/L turned out to be 277 Hides we presume therefore that certain long haired Hides were thought to be Guanaco Skins.

10. Since our last we have paid the Hosmos Agents £137. 2. 6 for Freight of the Stanley Assembly Room p. S.V. 'Penlaur' at the reduced freight 3/- and 5%, also Rownson's Invoice 393. 18. 8 After copy enclosed they allowing a Discount of 2½% £10. 8. I find we mentioned this Discount in our letter to Mr. Turner on 11<sup>th</sup> May last but if the G.A.R.C. claim this we ought to make a charge for this business so Please the matter in your hands having mentioned the matter at the end of our last Despatch. I regret to learn from M<sup>s</sup>rs. Rownson & Co. that owing to the great number of packages, the increase of freight through the protective timber packing and the strike of labourers they were not able to get it free to Hamburg from Bristol but have had to charge an extra freight of £12. 10. 8 & explain this by letter today to Mr. G. Turner and trust he will consider we have done the best for his Company, & inform him that we have paid Rownson the full amount £393. 18. 8 without the Discount.

11. Mr. Ernest G. Williamson is the Gentleman mentioned in the last Despatch as going out for M<sup>s</sup>rs. W. Cooper & Neophews, Berkhamsted, to superintend the application of their Sheep Dip and we trust you will receive him in your House and pay him every attention as he understands Sheep Farming having an Estancia in Entre Rios - I have made him a Copy of the last division of Farms upon the double Chart as obtained from Mr. Dean (already mentioned to you) and he has kindly promised to make notes on them and if possible enter our fences & return them which would partially make good the unfortunate loss of my old Chart: M<sup>s</sup>rs. Cooper wish him to do the work thoroughly and do not bind him to return by the 15<sup>th</sup> Jan<sup>t</sup>. Mail as mentioned so pray give him introductions to all the Sheep Farmers on the West as well as the East and advise them in visiting them, for if their Dip proves to be what they assert it is, and the increasing sale in all parts of the world proves it must be good, proper application under Mr. Williamson's instructions will be of

infinite advantage to the whole Colony: your Brother Hawtyn who goes out by this Steamer will be able to give him much information about the Colony.

12. The Board have allowed Capt<sup>n</sup> Wimber to take his Wife with him in the 'Orifa' for a nominal payment of Five Pounds for her provisions, her daughter 4 years old will accompany her: we take as Passengers Edw<sup>r</sup> W<sup>m</sup> and Walter Gant Wilkins, 12 and 11 years old next December, at £20 each half to be paid on embarkation by their Aunt Miss Wilkins 11 Waterloo Road, Wellington, Somersetshire. We are loading the Orifa as fast as the present dilatoriness of Suppliers allows us and hope to start her on the 4<sup>th</sup> or 5<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>t</sup>, it is a very troublesome shipment being for so many Farmers and having to be stowed separately. Baillon & Hickney ordered 28 lbs Mountain Rose Tobacco as this small quantity could not be shipped in bond a regular sized case is sent c<sup>r</sup> 8,211 which must be opened at Stanley and above order sent to Fox Bay by the 'Orifa'. Townend Bro<sup>r</sup> asked to be allowed to ship goods for Greenshields and J. Watson, as the former has an account in our Stanley Ledger we agreed to take some on receiving list of goods as she was filling up this has not been done and I have not heard of any being at the getty so presume they cannot get them ready - we declined Watson not being in our Ledger: we send the Farmers one Invoice with all their Stores entered as per detailed Invoices accompanying it and state that the freight, insurance, dock charges and any extra expenses will be sent out by the next Mail - the whole of the shipment will be debited to Island Administration as usual and you will have to pay it from the Store to the Farmers Accounts.

As there are so many rough Stores ordered we have chartered the 'Dennis Brundrit' for £1,000 out as per Charter dated 19<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> and send List of Cargo to be shipped, I cannot fix a date for her starting but shall try for the last week of this month: an excellent Boiler will be sent for the Blacksmith's Shop.

Forgot to mention that 50 casks Bottled Beer, 50 bales Hay and 50 cases Milk are just ordered to fill up 'Orifa', the first must go being bonded goods & as much of the other two as can be packed in, any left for the D. Brundrit.

Dennis Brundell we acknowledge your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 487 dated 21<sup>st</sup> Aug. received 14<sup>th</sup> ult., N<sup>o</sup>. 488 of 15<sup>th</sup> Sept. received 21<sup>st</sup> ult. and N<sup>o</sup>. 489 of 24 Sept. which arrived on 28<sup>th</sup> ultimo.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 485, 18a. With respect to your enquiry about the Commission upon the Dividends due to yourself and Mr. Langdon the Board considers that the same are due in case of leaving or decease after December of any year upon the working of the year to the end of December though the Dividend is not declared until the Annual Gen<sup>t</sup>. Meeting in the following June, and should the termination of service with the Company or decease occur between 1<sup>st</sup> Jan<sup>t</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup> March of any year then a quarter of the Commission would be due upon the Dividend for that year declared at the Annual General Meeting in June of the following year if termination of service or decease occurs between 31<sup>st</sup> March and 30<sup>th</sup> June then half Commission, if between 30<sup>th</sup> June and 29<sup>th</sup> Sept<sup>r</sup> then 3/4 Commission, if between 29<sup>th</sup> Sept<sup>r</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup> Dec<sup>t</sup> then the whole Commission upon the Dividend as declared for the Year in the June following.

3. N<sup>o</sup>. 487, 3. The Accounts sent for the S. A. Mills ironery Soc<sup>t</sup>. amounted to £43. 16. 1 we charged interest on the Cash Acc<sup>t</sup>. £. 13. 7 and on 17<sup>th</sup> Oct they accepted a Bill £48. 9. 8 at 90<sup>4</sup>s due 18 Jan 90.

4. Par 4. The Journal Entries for the purchase of M<sup>rs</sup> Dean's business will be carried out as you have divided the Land and Houses the Board having approved of same on the 4<sup>th</sup> instant, and the Directors and Auditors consider the Depreciation Account may be reduced as much as possible.

5. Par 5. We have shipped Bricks &c for the Calle-

Brundrit' and Mr. Robinson managing affairs here for the Bishop Trusts we shall be able <sup>w.</sup> let Mr. Brandon have a quantity of our Bricks, Lime & cement in order that the foundations may be commenced, and they are going to send out a quantity of materials by a vessel they have instructed Messrs. Langridge to charter & start by 10<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>o</sup>, the Directors wish you therefore to assist this business as much as possible and receive payment from the funds at Stanley as they deemed it proper to pay Mr. Robinson the £ 300 voted at our last Annual General Meeting as additional donation to the Church. Mr. Winnell, Clerk of the Works and two men go out by this Steamer to carry out the work. Messrs. Langridge have just called to report the charter of the Norwegian Bdg 'Dux' 381 tons Reg<sup>t</sup>. to sail 10<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup>, I observed it would have been better if they had fixed a few days later as the Mail due 2<sup>nd</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup> might bring & indent for rough Stores.

<sup>Part 6.</sup> Mr. Anson's order for Stores is deferred until further instructions except the Wool Preys, we immediately wrote Messrs. Thos. Berison & C<sup>o</sup> 124 West St, Leeds, to get this ready for present Mail, they said it was impossible so it is being made for the Steamer of 18 Jan<sup>o</sup>, we now (7 Nov) write to urge its being ready by end of month for this vessel which would arrive about the same date as the *Hosmos* St. and be much cheaper freight for Mr. Anson, besides no knocking about of transhipments: we must also <sup>send the Wool Bales.</sup>

<sup>7. Part 8.</sup> We learn from our Insurers at Lloyds that you are entitled to appoint certified Mates to command the Co<sup>s</sup>. Colonial vessels if there are no certified Masters for this business, as the same practice occurs in other Colonies and there would be no danger of a claim for Insurance being refused in consequence of a proper Mate only being employed.

<sup>8. Part 12.</sup> Mr. Dean informs us that the FireBars from Cott p. St. Schleswig were for some of his Machinery at Port Stephens so you had better send them there.

9. Par 14. We had already heard that there was a mortgage in favor of Mr. W. B. Waldron upon Port Howard but did not know that Beaver Island was included and we believe Mr. C. J. Mathews now in charge is his Cousin and doubtless the place will now be better managed: Messrs. Spearing & Waldron have not yet fixed a vessel for refrigerating though they have offered to buy Sheep from us on much the same terms as last June, <sup>to Langridge</sup> but the Directors have declined it.

10. Par 25. I will endeavour if possible to let you know before the Annual Meeting the anticipated Dividend, but as the Stanley Accounts are combined with ours only a short time prior to the Meeting the Mails may not enable this to be done.

11. Par 34. Even if Minns did work on the "Castalia" as she was rather undermanned he ought to pay something towards his passage and as he is employed by Mr. C. M. Dean at Port Stephens you might arrange this.

12. Par 39. Mr. Dean has paid £500 against the Stanley Account for Weddell Island, £350 for Port Stephens, £350 for Pebble Island. Mr. Edward Baillon states that he has paid off Spearing & Waldron and will now deal exclusively with the Co. - Messrs. Hoare have paid £1.16.10 for Baillon & Stickney and £150 for Bernhard Stickney's private account not for the Firm - Mr. M. J. Browne 14 Sweeting St., Liverpool, has paid £900 for Stickney Bros., Spring Point.

13. No. 488, 13. We send you another Report for the Annual General Meeting on 17<sup>th</sup> June last.

14. Par 16. The Board has instructed me to sign all Account Sales, and copies of Reports & Valuations of Produce will be sent for each client.

15. Par 14. We have shipped 200 cases Cooper's Sheep <sup>on consignment</sup> Dip, and at last moment as there was room 200, 10 gal drums of Little's Dip, though after all some Palings were left out - unfortunately copy of my number one letter on 4<sup>th</sup> Oct. P. O. 'bris' was not sent on 5 Oct for the 'John Elder' at Lisbon so you will not have heard of the £200 to be advanced to Mr. Williamson Agent for Cooper going in the 'John Elder'. I trust this will not cause any inconvenience.

16. Par 19. You have done quite right to send the 'Castalia' to Montevideo for men and cargo and we consider your proposal to keep some good men all the year round ought to have a trial as there must be many duties outside the sheep which would employ them properly & advantageously, the other day one of the Directors was asking whether there was any report about the Ditcher sent from Scotland some time since to attend to the streams and drain the peat bogs, as he considered a second one could be profitably employed over our large area of land, let us hear what progress has been made in such work & if it would not be well to set some of the extra retained men for such like services.

17. N<sup>o</sup> 489, 3<sup>rd</sup> Mef<sup>rs</sup> Broderson Vaughan &c<sup>c</sup> are satisfied with our explanations about their 'Ballumbie' tho' they would have been better pleased if you had given some hint how long she would be detained at Stanley. Mef<sup>rs</sup> W. J. Myers Son &c<sup>c</sup> object to 7½% upon £6.13.4 allowed for Carpenter's work and we have returned them £3.10.1, they also claim 1/3 Commission on £95.8.6 and half Agency £25 this we declined but they ask the Directors to reconsider their decision. Lloyd's sent yesterday copy of Telegram about the 'Arthusa' burnt at sea, I wrote Mef<sup>rs</sup> Hamilton Bros. 26 Fenwick St., Liverpool, that a letter posted this day would go out from Dartmouth.

18. This Despatch contained your letter of 24 Sep to Mr. Langdon with the incorrect Power of Attorney in your favor for realizing her property at Stanley, another one has been made out and signed on 31<sup>st</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> being now enclosed: the Stanley Probate of Will would not pass at the Bank of England so she has had to take out a Probate here and pay 2½% Duty upon the Bank Stock £61.18.10 and £200, we therefore wish you to claim a return of the duty paid at Stanley upon these amounts. Mr. Langdon has written the Board asking for a Pension on account of her Husband's long service and efficient duties with the C<sup>r</sup>, this the Directors have been obliged to decline but have presented her with a half year's Salary and as the entry in the Stanley Journal

in the Stanley Journal is incorrect for his Salary through the Commission on Dividend being added to the Salary and charged for nearly half a year there is a credit of £ 83. 2. 7 in her favor, as per statement herewith - and her Son Frederick's passage to England is to remain open for a year from the date of her leaving Stanley - the Directors have also agreed to provide a headstone for Mr. Langdon's grave, which will probably go by the 'Dux'. Mr. Langdon presented Mr. J. G. Fellows Orders on the C<sup>o</sup> at Stanley, N<sup>o</sup>. 62 favor G. Turner £ 38 dated 4<sup>th</sup> Sept - N<sup>o</sup>. 66 dated 13 Sept. 89 favor Mr. Langdon 13. 5. 6, these sums were paid to her on 31<sup>st</sup> ult<sup>v</sup> though not entered on Statement upon Accounts N<sup>o</sup>. 275 dated 16<sup>th</sup> Sept. 89 ex Despatch 488.

19. The 'Orissa' sailed on 4<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>v</sup> but was unfortunately detained at Deal until 12<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>v</sup>, her accounts have not yet been made up, Capt<sup>r</sup> Winther's account for Advances Notes was wrong he gave a list for 32.15. - we paid 30.12. - there were no letters with the proforma Invoices for Bonner, Holmested, Blake, Birch & Baillon as I had written for the others, I hope you were able to make good the deficiency - Townsend have no sent list of Greenshields' goods for Customs Manifest - though not ticked by Male in his cargo book the bale of Twine N<sup>o</sup>. 82 for Bertrand was on board, also Blake's N<sup>o</sup>. 299 and Birch's 39 coils Wire - seven full accounts of our Clients Stores & expenses by the 'Orissa' are now sent - there were several lots shut out which have been shipped by the 'D. Brundrit' as you will see by her Bill of Lading and Cargo Book - the whole affair gave infinite trouble but has been carried out with the utmost care - the Orissa's B/L for Dean at Pebble Est? has no port or consignee.

20. The 'Dennis Brundrit' sailed on 5<sup>th</sup> inst. with a very full cargo - we accepted goods for the Cathedral and the Baptist Chapel, freight & insurance payable here and as Mr. Robinson states that he believes Mr. Brandon will require most or

all our Bricks, Lime & Cement we have decided to send out  
<sup>otherwise</sup> more so that our own requirements may not be carried out -  
speaking of Bricks Mr. Dean observed lately that he shipped

and takes out two working men, there are also five other  
third class passengers as per names given - as the <sup>15</sup>Rams are  
three different breeds you can send one kind to each of our  
Station as you may think the breed suitable for that country  
and the sheep there - the Mate Capt. Thomas' Son has a gratuity  
Certificate for 10/- for each Ram landed alive in good condition -  
Capt. Thomas wished me to tell you that the wood, paling &c  
were received wet and will steam to the injury of some of the  
cargo, he trusts you will be able to give him some Wool home.

21. The Denderah 16 Sep 89 had three bales short of  
the 35 bales Sheepskins & shipped for Capt. Packe according to  
the Mate's assertions to Mssrs. Frueler & Burchard.

The Wasp's old Boiler ex C. C. Horning 9 June 87 was at length  
been sold for £31.10.-, expenses £5 thus realizing £26.10.-.  
The Royal have reduced the Insurance on the 'Great Britain'  
to 25/- per cent. The Genl. Neko's Wool, Sheepskins and Tallow  
arrived on 4<sup>th</sup> instant. Enclosed is Mr. Paget's Bill for £50  
upon Mr. James Turner which he will feel obliged by being  
collected and remitted to this Office. The Royal Insurance Co.  
send Almanacs and Diaries by book post. Mssrs. Denison  
inform this morning that Anson's Wool Prebs can hardly be ready  
for the 'Dux' so it must go by the 18 Jan. Mail though the  
Dux ought to arrive about the same time I thought of it for cheap-  
ness & not being knocked about, we shall send the Wool pack's Anson  
orders at the same time. Enclosed is letter from the London  
Dock Co. asking you to obtain Certificate of the landing at Spring  
Point one cask Whiskey ft. 'Grandholm' 19 Feb 90 as they have  
had to pay Duty upon it here which the London Dock C° could  
recover on production of such a Certificate.

22. The Board considers Mr. C. M. Dean would audit the Stanley Accounts, his Father writes him asking him to undertake this duty. The Wool Brokers say that the fleeces could be bound up with the neck wool instead of twine but will it be necessary to tie up the fleeces if they are carefully rolled up separately. Mr. Dean says that we ought to charge interest to our Clients from the date of the arrival of their orders for Stores as we have to retain our Cash from that time to pay for the same. Freights and prices of Stores have gone up lately specially Iron, this must be borne in mind even for the Cathedral supplies though Mr. Robinson often refers to your letter to the Rev. Brandon of 5 March last but we have told him that as their full requirements were not stated at that period we are entitled to raise prices if necessary. Capt<sup>n</sup>. Campbell was here the other day to order supplies for the 'H. Y. dalsah' he said she was at Weymouth a better place for fitting out than Dartmouth and would sail shortly, she is evidently brought there as Gov<sup>r</sup>. Kerr is living there & has taken a house for the winter, Capt<sup>n</sup>. Ecklin is in the Coastguard there.

23. Mess<sup>r</sup>s. Bonner, Bischoff &c. have at length sent Counsel's Opinion dated 7<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> upon Capt<sup>n</sup>. Hansen's questions about killing Seals upon his leased Government lands Jason Carabs and other Islands, which is now sent as it states that he has the right of killing Seals which are ripe mature during the open season. We remit the usual £600 Bill on the Stanley Treasury.  
Mr. Bonner was to have left by Pacific Steamer on 30<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> but illness has prevented it, I believe he will start as soon as possible.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 490, 5. As the Gulf Line convey Wool from Sandy Point to London at an inclusive rate it is singular they have not informed us of this as we were in correspondence with them about their Steamers, <sup>calling</sup> at Stanley and we have written to enquire if this cheap rate is a fact, also for their Itinerary as it might answer our purpose to send Wool to Sandy Point by our Schooners if the Thomas C<sup>o</sup>. do not provide sufficient Steamers to bring it quick for the early sales and we hope to send their answer by the Supplementary Mail.

3. Par 8. We approve of the excellent suggestion to limit the payment of our Cheques for Camp people to one year, the same will be printed and sent by Mail of 18<sup>th</sup> proximo.

4. Par 9. The loss of lives by the burning of the 'Aethusa' is very melancholy, we had several enquiries on behalf of Mr<sup>r</sup> Hamilton the Captain's Widow whose mind was much relieved by a very well written consolatory letter from the Rev<sup>r</sup> Harris. On the 18<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>. 9.50 am Telegram Home N<sup>o</sup>. 82 arrived about 'Embleton' having put in for repairs, we immediately wrote Messrs P. Fredele & Son, Mersey Chambers, Liverpool, the usual letter, they have not replied so we take it for granted that they accept the Captain's draft: on the same day Lloyd's sent your Telegrams about the 'Amanda', 'Anoy' and 'William Davis', we could not discover when these Telegrams left Stanley or how they came up to Montevideo but presumed the 'Castalia' would have left Stanley about the 9<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup> with the shipwrecked Crews, so we asked Lloyd's if they could not arrange for you to give the Stanley date by wiring the number of the day of

the year and they have kindly granted our request and send you Code words to carry this out from the 1<sup>st</sup> Inst. which will be a great advantage to us and Shipowners - now it appears from advices from Hamburg that these Telegrams have been brought up by the S.S. 'Tharrik' which left M. Vido on 16<sup>th</sup> ult. and is due at Dartmouth 12<sup>th</sup> or 13<sup>th</sup> inst. so presumably she brings home the crews & must have been at Stanley many days before the Mail date the 15<sup>th</sup> ultimo.

5. Par 10. Mr. Langdon has paid Two Pounds for the Paddle sold with her effects by Auction.

6. Par 11. The Board cannot move in the matter of the Company to be formed for some Land in Tierra del Fuego about to be obtained from the Chilean Government, but they hope that your surmises may prove true that we shall be able to sell them a quantity of old Ewes.

7. Par 13. I must have made a mistake about the change of Capt. Winkler from the 'Grisa' having been mentioned in a Despatch as I cannot come across it now, but I know it was mooted somewhere perhaps when you were here or in one of my semi official letters, however should you think that a more coasting Captain ought to be appointed when she next comes to London give us good time to look out for some one unless you can find one in the Colony.

8. Par 15. I regret exceedingly that Mr. Williamson Messrs. Cooper & Neale's Agent for their Sheep Dip should have hurried out to the Colony before he can be of service for Sheep dipping operations, and trust your communication to him at Sandy Point will enable him to delay his arrival at Stanley and earn the extra time to profitable business amongst the Sheep Farmers in Patagonia the Straits of Magellan and Tierra del Fuego.

9. Par 22. I delay further reply as N. 729, 4 and 10 reported further about the Stanley Assembly Room but as the Board did not give special instructions when this was read I take upon myself to decline charging a Commission for this Company upon such a good work for the Colony and as I was most economical in my journey to Bristol we will the Chairman reminds it was mentioned the Bd agreed to waive it.

say nothing about that little expense, tho' lost 2 days of my holidays.

10. Par 1<sup>y</sup>. I tried to see Mr. Wingfield yesterday about the 'Hadabsah' &c: but could not so hope to be able to call tomorrow and report by Supplementary Mail, she sailed from Falmouth on 24<sup>th</sup> ult., is insured for £500 at the London C°.

11. Par 2<sup>3</sup>. Brundrit' and need further for ourselves those in 'Orissa' as ballast could be used stones being substituted, we send you a £500 in gold per 'Dux', expedite shipment of Wool as much as possible, for our finance next month will be the interim Dividend will be very short - I tried to send this Telegram on the 5<sup>th</sup> inst. but the line was broken so it went on the 6<sup>th</sup> at 10.5 am and I trust it will be in time for the 'Theben' at Montevideo - the 'Dux' sails end of this week the Brokers say they offered a cheap rate of freight 2/- so we have shipped a quantity of Stores ordered by Indent 94 reserving some of each kind for the next Kosmos S. V. 'Osiris' of 18<sup>th</sup> prox., as the 'Dux' will arrive but a few days after her. Mr. E. Packe sends a quantity of Stores by her, he shipped 10 Romney Marsh Rams by the 'Theben' 9 Nov 89 costing an average of £7. 14. 0 each - he seems to be annoyed that Packe Brothers' account with Dean & Sons was not taken over by the C°, I was surprised and told him I believed this was done, please satisfy his Agent upon this point - he has paid £300 for Government Rents and would like the receipts sent here. Capt. Packe has paid 243. 12. 4 in addition to the 162. 3. - paid 25 Oct, this through some discrepancy in the account he received from Stanley. The 'Dux' has the Paling's shiv out of the 'D. Brundrit' - also Langdon Steel's Gravestones.

12. Letter 16 Oct 89. The Board are pleased that you are satisfied with Mr. Andrew Baillon as our Clerk and authorize you when he has served one year to increase his Commission on the Dividend for the second year to Ten Pounds (£10) upon each one per cent of Dividend. We have heard of a Gentleman suitable for your successor, Mr. Robert Nichol, who has had experience with Woolbrokers here and in France, has managed Sheep Farms in Australia and is likely to return to England.

Spearings & Waldron have chartered the 'Crosvenor' 234 tons to Straits of Magellan and back for £1290 - it is reported they have purchased the old 'Esca' 293 tons for £1700 to send to Port Howard astender to the meatship 'Hengist' 1125 tons now fitting out as Refrigerator.

We send papers about the Arktos Refrigerating Patent no machinery being required only chemical Ammonia which would be cheap for us to erect <sup>work</sup> except that the insulating walls need

to be of extra thickness. Messrs. Burneys have again been here about Chilean Steamers coaling I first said 65/- a ton as they thought it high and being Chilean I reduced it to 63/-, they have not heard from Paris, the Steamers are building in France, they told me the price of Coal at M. Vido has risen to 52/- a ton. Gamman & C. have paid £5 for 'Schleswig's' pilotage but decline paying 6.4.9 for the telegram as they say Mr. Schlottfeldt made the mistake which prevented them receiving it so he is answerable for this outlay, I hope they have furnished you proper evidence on this point to substantiate your claim on him.

14. Enclosed is the last Stanley Treasury Bill £600 though we trust you

Humphreys writes he has not heard from you about the 'Salembras' Sheep Skirts, 14 bales, sent to Buenos Ayres by the S.V. 'Menes' 10 Oct 88, we have not yet received the proceeds. W. Baker the F. & M. Co's Liquidator called yesterday expressing his surprise & regrets that the Affidavit of the publication and exhibition of the Notices respecting the winding up of the C: had not been received, he says any one could sign such an Affidavit and begs it may be done without further delay.

15. Pray excuse me not formally acknowledging your letters of 26 Aug and 16 Sep, the latter giving particulars of the S.V. 'Nekos' cargo, there is one bag Tallow extra, marked O whose is this? the Wool & Tallow has sold fairly well. We have claimed for Felton's missing bale of Wool ex 'Menes' 15 June 89 upon the 'Grosvenor' Co: but they deny our right having accepted their Bill of Lading having "one bale less in dispute" written on it, I shall still press the matter but in future we must not accept such Bills of Lading, if there is any doubt about the numbers the goods must be turned out for recounting. Langridge has just sent note that Townsend Bro: have chartered the Danish vessel 'Birgitte' 178 tons Reg: for £850 to West Falkland & back to London. James Steel has promised a Second class passage to his intended Miss Coish of 'Osiris' on 18<sup>th</sup> prox: M. Bonner left on 13<sup>th</sup> ult. by S.V. 'Aconcagua'. The arrival lately of the Pacific Steamer Itinerary has enabled me to extend and fill up our present Mail Table so I send you three copies. Whitaker's Almanacks are not yet published.
