Di Tella visit: "Completing my education"

EX Argentine Foreign Mnister Guido Di Tella has described his impending visit to the Falklands as "completing my education"

When Mr Di Tella arrives on October 14 he will be accompanied by his son, Luciano, daughter in law, Joanne and two of his grandchildren.

Mr Di Tella's grandchildren Nicholas and Benjamin are aged nine and eleven

His daughter-in-law and the children will be entering the Islands on British passports and Di Tella senior and his son on Argentine ones.

They will also be accompanied by Di Tella's personal friend and press secretary Jorge Raventos, as there are expected to be many members of the Argentine media accompanying the Di Tella party. The visit coincides with that of a group of Argentine next of kin.

Upon their arrival the group will go immediately to Port Howard for two nights and then on to visit Sea Lion Island, reportedly because Di Tella has promised his grand-children they will be able to see penguins. The party will arrive back in Stanley on Wednesday, October 18 and remain there for the rest of the week

Mr Di Tella stressed "I want to see the Islands, the community, so I feel I've completed my education."

The man who fulfilled the role of Foreign Minister for ten years under President Carlos Menem's administration became well-known for his so called *charm offensive*

towards Falkland Islanders

He said "I would very much like to meet all of the councillors and prominent members of the community, I will be very eager to meet everyone I can," adding, "There will be some people who are pleased about my visit, others annoyed or angry and others indifferent."

He has also agreed to give the Islands Broadcasting Station "....all the interviews they want. There will be people who won't want to talk to me, so if there is someone who wants to talk with me I would say yes. I will give all the interviews people want; whether or not the Islanders listen is up to them.

"I am trying not to raise political expectations at all, it's a personal trip with members of my family, so I think there shouldn't be any expectations," he added. "It's a private visit, period. I can't

dissociate myself from the fact that I was Argentine Foreign Minister for ten years, but now I'm just a prominent Argentine jubilado (pensioner)."

Clarin claimed on October 3 that Mr Di Tella told them that a good reception from the Kelpers would demonstrate that "...the charm policy is working."

The current Foreign Minister Rodriguez Giavarini has been subject to criticism of his policies on the Falklands by Di Tella. However, according to Clarin, a spokesman for Giavarini said, "...the point here is not to take a step backward or a step forward on the Malvinas issue; rather, it is to lend coherence to foreign policy and to stress that the Islanders are not party to the conflict."

THE nine remaining crewmembers of the Falklands registered vessel *Pardelhas*, currently being detained in Punta Arenas, have been able to fly home.

Pardelhas crew paid

The seamen received the equivalent of 20,000 US dollars and an air ticket. The Peruvians had to wait for over two months on the *Pardehlas* for their salaries to be honoured.

The nine seamen spoke on air in Punta Arenas thanking those residents who had assisted them while they were stranded. They made particular mention of the drivers of the bus line that carried them from the docks into the town to meet lawyers and follow the dispute in a local labour court.

Pardelhas is owned by Pardhelas Fishing Co. Ltd a joint venture between Falklands company Meredith Fishing Co. Ltd and Empresa de Pesca de Aveiro of Portugal

Talking to Penguin News about the dispute. Mr Roger Edwards of Meredith Fishing Company said that the Peruvian members of the crew had some time ago asked to be paid in the same manner as the Portuguese crew

However, as is common in the fishing industry, Mr Edwards explained, the Portuguese crew are paid after the fish is sold (basic salary plus a percentage of the fish).

The Pardelhas transhipped in Berkeley Sound in July but the catch only reached Vigo at the end of September. Consequently the crew were made to wait for their salaries - a situation to which they objected and took legal action as a result.

The ship was orginally detained in Punta Arenas after four Chilean ex crew members of a vessel related to *Pardelhas* claimed they had been unfairly sacked from it. As a result they asked for a retention order against the *Pardelhas* until the dispute was settled.

Mr Edwards said he expected that problem to be resolved by October 10 and then *Pardelhas* would return to fishing grounds.

Science brings Argentine vessels closer

ARGENTINE research vessels are now permitted to calibrate scientific equipment (used for the counting of fish) in a location in Falklands waters fairly near to shore.*

Executive Councillors made the decision following a discussion on aspects of arrangements for joint cruises with Argentine research vessels

Director of Fisheries John Barton told *Penguin News* yesterday that the Falklands Patrol Vessel *Dorada* has the same equipment (an echo sounder) and the aim is for the two vessels to exchange results of fish counts to see if they are comparable.

The latest in a series of joint surveys investigating southern blue whiting will begin today. The Argentine vessel involved is likely to be the Capitan Ocabalda.

*To calibrate an echo sounder a vessel must anchor in relatively shallow waters.

WHILE De La Rua's policies (or perceived lack of) on the Falklands, and the poor state of the Argentine economy, is a source of irritation to ex Foreign Minister Di Tella*, Islander views on the matters are varied.

De La Rua's rather erratic approach to the Falklands – veering between aggression and distance, cooperation and unhelpfulness – and the state of Argentina's domestic affairs, evoke two main responses in this part of the

world.

To some, the more hostile posture and the poor state of Argentina's economy is a source of satisfaction, almost smug gratification.

Let's face it, it's the devil we know

Unpredictable, belligerent, financially unstable and surrounded by allegations of corruption is historically what we have come to expect from Argentine politics.

An enemy without an unnerving camouflage of charm and credibility one facing large amounts of international tut-tutting — what could be better? Well, the opposing camp could suggest that security and predictability is

a far, far better thing.

While we may feel we know where we stand when Argentina is conspicuously antagonistic, not to mention troubled, still the disadvantages can-

not be ignored.

It might well involve existing in a state of tension, anticipating unfriendly Argentine acts that distract the Argentine public's attention from the state of their own economy, but impact negatively on ours. We would be fools to believe that Argentina could not, if she wished, cause us difficulties in our main area of industry.

For my part... I think I'll throw in a prayer for a healthy and wealthy Argentina who has more interest in her own booming economy than some

dusty old so-called claim to the Falklands

Perhaps I might also request of Him Upstairs that De La Rua grows to realise that paranoid policies on the Falklands simply remind Britain of those unhappy days before she began viewing Argentina as a maturing democracy.

Conservation Levy renamed

THE term Conservation Levy, which earlier this year attracted the criticism from the Conservation Officer and other environmentalists that it was "misleading", is to be changed to Passenger Tax.

The tax was one imposed on cruise ships landing in the Islands, however the funds were not automatically allocated to environmental projects as the title suggested, but gathered into government coffers.

At the time, government argued that although this was so, the money was returned to Falklands Conservation through their yearly budget allocations.

Conservation Officer Rebecca Ingham argued that the term was affecting sponsorship of Falklands Conservation by companies and tourists were less likely to donate to the organisation - their assumption being that they had already donated. (PN V11 No 48)

Ms Ingham suggested. "If those funds are general funds then

the name in turn should be a general name "

Following a meeting of the General Purposes Committee where the concerns were raised Councillor Norma Edwards said, "We discussed it but councillors did not feel there was any reason to change the name."

Last week however. His Excellency the Governor announced, "The term Conservation Levy has, in the view of Executive Council, led to some misunderstanding, and we propose to change it to passenger tax."

"This does not imply any reduction in support for conservation, but it is intended to avoid misunderstanding of the nature and purpose of the charge."

The Governor also confirmed that legal effect had been given to a Bill "...exempting from the levy cruise ships which had made at least one landing at a Camp location and paid a fee of at least US\$15 per head."

One-way system to proceed

THE proposed one-way system is to proceed subject to discussions abut the nature and timing of road repairs.

In his summary of the meeting of Executive Council the Governor said, "We had a further discussion of some of the points arising from the decision to introduce for an initial period of six months a one-way road system running clockwise along John Street and

Ross Road

"There was some uncertainty at our meeting about the impact of some road works which were not known about when the decision to introduce the scheme was taken."

The scheme will, however, proceed, unless further consultation about the nature and timing of road repair schemes forces us to the conclusion that it would be unworkable."

West Falkland freight rates agreed

IT was agreed in ExCo last week that a freight rate between £15 and £20 per cubic metre from and to nominated ports should be set for specified goods from West Falkland.

The Governor said, "The Falkland Islands Development Corporation had submitted to us a paper on inter-island transport.

"This addressed freight rates, refrigerated storage at Fox Bay or Port Howard, and the question of transporting livestock to the abattoir."

He explained that the latter two recommendations will involve further studies.

Civil Service probationary periods to be reduced

PROBATIONARY periods for appointments to the Government Service are to be reduced.

It was decided in Executive Council that existing probationary periods are too long, and it that it made sense to reduce them from two years or one year to six months or three months.

ExCo also approved an application by Falklands Conservation to land on Beauchene Island to carry out research into Albatross breeding.

The Governor said, "The rec-

ommendation that, in future, these matters need not come to Executive Council was not, however, agreed."

An application by the Public Works Department to extract stone from the stone run North West of Mount Kent was also approved at the meeting.

The Governor commented, "We were, however, concerned to ensure not only that the site be left neat and tidy, but that concerns for the impact on the landscape should be addressed throughout the project, and not only on its conclusion."

Memorial helped by FIG donation

A DONATION of £15,000 has been approved by Executive Council towards the restoration of the Royal Marines Memorial in The Mall. London, thus meeting the shortfall needed for the Appeal to reach its target of £85,000.

The statue, which was first erected in 1903, has been restored to its former glory and will now be recognised as a National Memorial to pay tribute to those Royal Marines who served all round the Globe in

the 20th Century

The Falkland Islands and the Royal Marines have a long association, going back to 1766 when they helped build the first British settlement on the Islands. An almost continuous presence has been maintained since then and in 1964 a permanent detachment was established In 1976 the people of the Falkland Islands conferred the Freedom of Stanley upon the Royal Marines "in recognition and appreciation of the close association which has existed between the Falkland Islands and the Royal Marines for more than two

At the time of the Argentine invasion of 1982 the Marines put up a gallant defence of Stanley and subsequently played a significant role in the recapture of the Islands, with nearly fifty percent of the Corps be-

ing deployed.

Councillor Sharon Halford, who will present the cheque to Major General Hardy on Monday said, "It is fitting that the Falkland Islands Government has been able to contribute to the Memorial. We are very proud of our long-standing links with the Royal Marines and this is a wonderful opportunity to record appreciation on behalf of the people of the Falkland Islands."

Lieutenant Colonel Andrew

Noyes, from the Royal Marines' National Appeal Committee, commented, "We are very grateful to the Falkland Islands Government for its generous donation. The Memorial is a significant part of our Millennium activity and we are delighted to have reached the Appeal's target." The Memorial will be officially opened by HRII The Duke of Edinburgh, Captain General of the Royal Marines, on October 29

A further donation was approved by Executive Council to assist financially the project of "Swasie" Turner who plans carry out a wheelchair yomp on the weekend of Remembrance Sunday in order to raise money for the South Atlantic Medal

Association.

According to His Excellency, the Governor, Mr Donald Lamont, Executive Council also expressed support for the British Legion and agreed. "...to commemorate those who have died in war by observing 2 minutes silence at 11.00 on the eleventh day of the eleventh month of the year - the Anniversary of the Armistice in 1919. It was agreed to ask the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station to mark that time and observe the silence in the period in question

The Falklands branch of the Royal British Legion are making a particular effort this year to raise funds, including a variety show in the Town Hall on November 8.

Funds raised in the Poppy Appeal go to support ex-servicemen who, having placed their lives at the service of their country, now need support and help. I hope that the Poppy Appeal will evoke the generous response which is characteristic of the people of the Falkland Islands when there are appeals for money to be raised for charity.

Farewell to Falklands fisheries friend

EXTRACTS from a tribute to Peter John Derham, former head of fisheries protection in England and a major player in the establishment of the Falklands fishery, who died recently. By Captain Neil Downes, chief fishery officer of Devon Sea Fisheries Committee.

Born in 1930. Peter John Derham was raised near Taunton but obviously there was salt in his veins and on leaving school he went to the School of Navigation at Warwash.

Life was tough at this establishment and it was colloquially known as one of Britain's better corrective training centres. Nevertheless he appeared to thrive on it and became the top cadet before moving on to serve his time with the ships of the Royal Fleet Auxiliary (RFA) supporting the armed services with their needs around the world.

During his time with the RFA he returned to Somerset where he met Naomi who he later married in 1955. However separation was not conducive to family life and he came ashore in 1957 and joined the Sea Fisheries Inspectorate of the Ministry of Agriculture. Fisheries and Food. Peter initially served six years at Poole before being promoted to District Inspector in London in 1963 when the family, as they now were, moved from Poole to Hook and a year later to Hartney

Wintney. During the period 1963-1975 it became apparent that Peter was going to be one of life's innovators who loved to utilise the developments in technology to advance the management of sea fisheries and he eventually became the first International Inspector under the NE Atlantic Fisheries Committee.

It was in the Icelandic fisheries dispute of 1975 where Peter came into his own. He was initially one of the support commanders for the British fleet and latterly was promoted to run the show. These were difficult times, when tempers of trawler skippers flared and it needed a steady nerve and gentle persuasion to defuse the situation. Peter had these qualities and he used them to good effect on many occasions. For his contribution to the management of the British fishing vessels he was deservedly awarded the OBE

From the lessons learnt during the Icelandic dispute. Peter was very active in ensuring that effective measures were in place when the EU declared a 200 mile EEZ on January 1, 1977.

It had been decided to use both Nimrod aircraft and RN patrol vessels to police the UK sector of this vast new area of sea. Initially all went well, but Peter could never come to terms with the military thinking and many a heated discussion took place between the various incumbents who held the title 'Captain Fish' of the Fishery Protection Squadron.

Peter, now promoted to Chief Inspector, argued that the job could be carried out more cost effectively by a civilian organisation. He was partially successful and replaced the RAF Nimrod operation with a civilian aerial surveillance service in 1987

Later that year (October) he received a summons to 10 Downing Street where he was made an offer by 'Mrs T' that he could not refuse. It had been decided that the fisheries around the Falklands should be managed by the Falkland Islands administration.

It was going to need patrol vessels and aerial surveillance and it had to be in place and operational by February 1, 1988. Rather a tall order, but he achieved it. Many hours were spent obtaining vessels - converting them for the task - and acquiring specialist personnel. The

aircrafthad to be dismantled, flown down by special aircraft and reassembled.

Whilst working in the Falklands he was made another offer to come and run the fisheries for them. This he did and he and his wife Naomi spent a very happy seven months in Stanley before returning home and taking charge of his company PDA Ltd which he had formed in the intervening period.

Through his company he still managed the Falkland fisheries but also undertook assignments elsewhere in the world. Indeed his interests in fisheries and fishermen never faltered and he was active in advisory and aid schemes to the Third World until the end.

Peter was one of life's characters who liked nothing more than to have a yarn and laugh about his exploits and those of others. His energy and drive to achieve change was commendable and we all have learnt something from the example he set.

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Mila allegations: avoid a "political witch hunt"

YOUR editorial and other views from the Councillors office regarding the Mila are duly noted

In my interview with you I made it very clear that the owners of the Mila do not in any way condone any breach of the FIG fishing license, whatever it might be.

Lalso believel made it clear that we would take any actions that were necessary if the vessel were found to have breached any of its license conditions. This remains the case once the full circumstances have been investigated and the facts determined as closely as possible.

However I have to say that at this time the only evidence we as owners have seen about illegal fishing is that contained on a website that I believe you have used as your source of information; this website is not renowned for the total accuracy of its publications. I believe even we are entitled to the presumption of innocence until proven guilty—not a sentiment which leaps from your editorial.

It is clear to us as owners that the captain of the vessel has sought to deceive both the owners and the Government in relation to his movements by entering incorrect reports of his position. His explanations will be properly sought by the Department of Fisheries, who will then decide whether any further action is required, and whether there was any other offence.

As to whether the Government is embarrassed by this alleged incident it seems to me that there has so far been more heat than light.

If a Falklands flagged vessel has committed any misdemean our then the Government must deal with it. It can only be embarrassed if it fails to deal properly and fairly with the facts as presented. The Government can not be held to have acted improperly if it has attempted to enforce proper regulation.

Our view is that the Government should not condone any activity which is contrary to license conditions, and no doubt it will ensure it has fulfilled its responsibilities to the full.

As far as my personal position is concerned I have always been very conscious of my responsibilities, and will be conscious of my responsibilities in respect of this alleged incident.

But whatever the views of the editor and others about the Government being embarrassed even if the vessel were innocent, whatever actions the owners take will be in respect of the proven facts, not some political witch hunt.

During those years my dad gave lots of interviews for Argentinian television about this episode. Thank you very much.

Glossy Journal for 2001

THE Falkland Islands Journal will celebrate the new Millennium by publishing a larger edition (both in content and format) with a glossy cover.

The Journal is an apolitical annual publication covering a wide range of historical and scientific subjects related to the islands.

To cover the additional costs and to allow an increased print run the Falkland Islands Development Corporation has approved a grant of £900, up to £1,500 to allow 200 copies of the Millennium Journal CD-ROM to be produced.

Reindeer funds

FUNDING for the Reindeer Project is to be found from within existing FIDC cash resources.

The project requires £150,000 which will be taken from Meat Industry Development (£20,000) Horticultural Projects (£30,000) Calcified Seaweed (£35,000) and Industrial Property - warehousing for Lookout Industrial Estate - (£65,000).

Sorting LanChile out FORMER General Manager FIDC Hugh Normand is currently involved in dealing with the problem of delays to LanChile flights.

Acting General Manager Richard Baker said on Friday that Mr Normand, "...appears to be on the way to sorting it out."

Board members approve Hugh to review transport

DEVELOPMENT Corporation Board Members last Friday approved a recommendation to commission a transport review at an estimated cost of £6,000.

The review will be undertaken by the former General Manager FIDC Mr Hugh Normand, who also prepared the Terms of Reference.

One of the issues investigated will be the extent to which MoD and civilian transport systems can be integrated.

Michael Blanch Chief Executive commented that the review would

"...bring to fruition a programme that started nine months back." (Military/civilian discussions have been taking place over past months on the matter of the vessels *Tamar* and *St. Brandan*).

He explained that Mr Normand had been chose for his "knowledge so far." and because, "...he is sensitive to the issues involved." Dr. Blanch referred to the political sensitivities involved in sea and airlinks with South America.

He said the review could not be

conducted "in-house" because FIDC is currently a senior staff member short and will soon be "two down"

Councillor Luxton and Mr Terence McPhee noted their unhappiness that the proposal for the review had been reported by the media before they had a chance to discuss it.

The were reminded that giving the public access to such papers was in the interest of open government.

Organic certification: "Good feedback" from farmers

MATTHEW Bell of Organic Producers Ltd attended a meeting of the Development Corporation Executive Board last week to update members on the progress of organic certification in the Falkland Islands.

Among other tasks, Mr Bell was hired to train an organic inspector, set up a review committee and produce an organic certification system.

Mr Bell commented that he had had "good meetings" with "positive feedback" from stake-holders and the Rural Business Association, adding, "We identified areas where we can do something fairly quickly. I was very encouraged by the response from the farming community."

He explained that organic conversion would have implications for every aspect of the Islands including tourism, seafood and meat, but, "...with the focus mainstay, wool."

He believed the conversion would be very positive for the Falklands and, "...not just on the financial side."

Mr Bell supported the Chief

Executive's comment that he believed the organic certification conversion period would be about one year.

Responding to a question from Councillor Bill Luxton who asked whether organic certification for wool was occurring elsewhere. Mr Bell said there it in New Zealand but it was "all very amateurish."

Mr Bell noted that in the Falklands the problem of wool contamination from dipping agents was a problem that "needed sorting."

Biological Diversity Convention for FI?

THE possible implementation of articles relating to conserving biological diversity in the Falklands is to be looked into by a newly-established working group.

At a meeting held on Monday, the Environmental Committee examined a paper prepared by the Environmental Planning Officer discussing the Convention on Biological Diversity which the UK Government signed up to at the Conference on Environment and Development in Rio de Janeiro on June 5, 1992.

According to the paper. "In doing so, (HMG) committed itself to conserve biological diversity, to use biological resources in a sustainable way and to share equita-

bly the benefits arising from the use of genetic resources."

The committee agreed to establish a working group to examine the relevant articles of the Convention who will report back to the committee with recommendations, "as to the way forward."

The working group will translate the articles into easier-to-understand terms in order for public consultation to take place. A copy of the articles relating to the Falkland Islands are available in the public library.

Penguin News hopes to print further information on the Convention on Biological Diversity in the near future.

National Herbarium planned for Falklands

A NATIONAL HERBARIUM is to be established in the Falkland Islands.

At their meeting on Monday, the Environmental Committee heard that the Herbarium, a collection of dried Falklands plants, mounted and classified systematically, is to be housed in the Department of Agriculture.

Following changes in staff at the Department, a special laboratory has become available for the Herbarium

According to minutes of a Falklands Conservation meeting called to specifically discuss the Herbarium, the plant collection will be logged, "into a computerised database which should physically accompany it for reference by those wishing to use the Herbarium."

Long term responsibility for the Herbarium is to lie with the Falkland Islands Government and funding has come from various sources including the Shackleton Scholarship, Falklands Conservation and FIG.

It is hoped the Herbarium will be up and running by the end of March 2001.

Di Tella visit: "A personal trip with my family"

IN his first interview with the media since he left office ten months ago, former Argentine Foreign Minister Dr Guido Di Tell speaks to Heather Briley for MercoPress about his life out of office and his pending journey to the Islands.

MercoPress: What have you been up to during the last ten months?

"Adjusting to a normal life. I've tried to avoid any statements of any sort, because I think it was my duty to give some time allowances. Now nearly after a year of the new administration I think I can speak openly without any problems.

Tam very eager to finally go to the Islands; I said originally I didn't want to rush, this is not a competition to see who gets there first but try to build up normal relations of communities of people who have been at odds in the past. I have ideas and how to go about things and now we see that the new administration have their own ideas and how they go about things. I'm quite sure I will be very well received by many people, but not everyone; not everyone - of course there will be some people who are disappointed or object to things I have said or am saying, but, that's

MP: So how have you been leading a normal life?

DT: "I spent a lot of time in Oxford, I have an arrangement there as an Honorary Fellow and I must spend a term there every year. In fact I am going back for a month immediately after my visit to the Islands and then will be going back next year for a term.

MP: What other things have you been doing?

DT: "I continue to be very interested in the Falkland Islands issue. Chile was something where we were able to finish our job (referring to the Continental Ice dispute.) With the Falkland Islands we didn't finish our job. I think the matter can be finished within the future. We'll have to wait twenty to forty years. Of course we have to find a compromise if we want to find a solution. If we insist upon having one hundred percent what we want (it will not work), but I think if there is political will some sort of solution can be reached. It can be done.

MP: Have you any ambition to return to politics?

DT: "In politics the last thing you can do is dismiss something entirely. Originally I thought I would be eager to continue in politics, but after one year out of politics I'm beginning to have second thoughts."

MP: You became well-known for your so-called 'charm offensive' or 'seduction policy' towards the Islanders, it would now seem the new government is giving the Islanders the cold shoulder compared to you.

DT: "Well, I'm really very dis-

appointed by the lack of policies especially and to some extent there are some points which I think are wrong."

MP: For example?

DT: "We have discovered something which is very important, which is that the Islanders do exist, it's not fantasy, it's not a Di Tella fantasy - some of them are not that nice. To go to the designations, conversations and meetings and be proud of not saying hello I think is very bad, it's rude. This is the way the Islanders behaved with me in the past but they changed that one year ago. And since then we have had very normal relations, shaking hands, hugging."

ging MP: Do you think some of the Islanders might miss you?

DT: "I hope so. The Falklands is not a subject that is out of my mind, it's very much on my mind because I believe it is something which can be finished if one is realistic, one has to be. I think a solution is needed because it is better to solve a problem when we don't have a particular pressure, so it would be very good if we could continue with the 'seduction' or whatever expression you want to call it."

MP: So you think the 'seduction' policy achieves more?

DT: "I hope the foreign ministry will have second thoughts and reassess its counterproductive attitude at the moment."

MP: Do you have any contact with the new authorities?

DT: "Just from time to time we say hello, but nothing else."

MP: Do you think the July 14th 1999 agreement has worked?

DTL"It has been very, very important: the previous situation was shameful. The position we have now is not as good as it could be, but it's basically normal."

MP: What about poaching? DT: "That's a joint problem we have, it's not a problem of the British or the Argentines. It's one of the many joint problems and we have to find joint solutions."

MP: That's up to the present Argentine government, but it would seem they are not doing anything.

DT: "That's my impression."
MP: So, finally you are going to the Falkland Islands.

DT:"Yes, with my son, daughter-in-law and two grandchildren, and my press advisor. We're going straight to Port Howard when we arrive, for two nights then on to Sea Lion Island and then back to Stanley.

"I not only want to visit the Argentine cemetery but also the British cemetery, I feel very few people have gone to the British cemetery in San Carlos. I want to go and pay my respects to the people killed on the other side as well."

MP: Will you meet the Councillors?

DT: "I'd very much like to meet all the Councillors and some of the other prominent people in the community. I will certainly be very eager to meet them."

MP: How do you think the average Islander will react to your visit. Do you expect a demonstration with people out with banners in the streets saying 'Di Tella Go Home'?

DT: "Islanders behave much better than people think. There will be some people who will be annoyed or angry because I go, others pleased and others will be indifferent. I'm trying not to raise political expectations at all. It's a personal trip with members of my family, so I think there shouldn't be any expectations as a consequence of my Irin."

MP: Do you think you will be criticised by the current Argentine government?

DT: "Unfortunately I expect so. I think it's a pity that instead of seeing as an asset the fact that a former foreign minister can get along with the members of the Islands community it is (viewed with) disputs!"

MP: Do you think they will be in touch with you after your visit?

DT: "No. I am not expecting it, it may happen or not. It is a private visit, period. I can't dissociate myself from the fact that I have been foreign minister for ten years, but I'm a prominent Argentine

'jubilado' (pensioner).

"I want to see the Islands; by seeing the place and the (getting the feel of) the community I'm completing my education.

MP: Changing the subject slightly, a movie filmed in the Falkland Islands recently opened in Buenos Aires. What did you think of it?

DT: "It's a terrible movie unless you have a particular interest in the Islands or the issue, nobody would go to see such a movie. It depicts on Argentine who has all the faults of an Argentine plus a few other faults. Something which is a bit shocking is that they (the filmmakers) filmed people who were unaware they were being filmed. That's what shocked me most. It seems the film violated no laws in the Islands but to me it was shocking because they invaded people's privacy. It's disagreeable. It's a bit better at the end when the English actress makes her point and balances it out. It's the kind of thing that it would have been better if it had not been done.

MP: And the rather unfortunate title?

DT: "Here nobody really knows what it really means, they could have called it 'blue, blue.' The title is aggressive, but the film less so. The best thing to do is forget about it."

MP: Is there anything else you would like to add?

DT: "Yes, after my visit!"






Officers dismissed radar warning of exocet attack on HMS Sheffield

The Guardian. September 26, 2000. OFFICERS aboard the aircraft carrier Invincible failed to alert other British warships about the first Exocet missile attack during the Falklands conflict although they had 19 minutes warning, it was revealed vesterday.

One missile - fired from an Argentine plane first spotted on radar 180 miles away - hit the destroyer HMS Sheffield, killing 20 men and wounding 24. The Ministry of Defence confirmed yesterday that a series of sightings on HMS Invincible were dismissed by senior officers as 'spurious' and that no warning was passed to other ships in the Falklands task force.

HMS Sheffield, only on half-alert and with its own radar not fully operational, got little more than a minute's warning. The attack caused the first mass British casualties of the south Atlantic war in 1982

Yesterday a former radar operator on the carrier. David Forster, 37, said the officer who decided not to warn the fleet should 'admit and explain' his decision: 'I want him to apologise.'

He said the officer, in the Invincible electronic operations room dismissed sightings by him and other operators by accusing them of 'chasing rabbits'. Mr Forster added that he personally felt he had 'let 20 men die" by failing to insist that other ships were alerted. This has been on my mind for the last 18 years.

I should have stood up and shouted. There's something coming in believe me - alert the fleet. I'll always punish myself in my conscience for the death of those men. The Sheffield was a sitting duck. It never had a chance to change course, fire its chaff [anti-radar foil] or even its missiles. Remorse and sadness lie heavy on my heart.

The MoD ruled out an inquiry into the conduct of the officer responsible, whose identity has not yet been officially confirmed. No doubt the officer will still be thinking if only. a spokesman said. Remorse

I don't think that blame is the word, given the set of circumstances. But that does not relieve him of a sense of personal and professional regret.

Last night Des Keoghane, organiser of the Falklands Families Association, said, 'I have spoken to a parent of one of the Sheffield dead. He has not heard of this before - and neither have I.'

Invincible sthen captain, Admiral Sir Jeremy Black, who rose to be home fleet commander-in-chief and an aide de camp to the Queen before retiring from the navy in 1992, declined to comment.

The MoD confirmed the incident, on May 4, 1982, after a Guardian investigation into separate accounts

from two ex-able seaman radar operators on the Invincible. The operators, now civilians, have not previously disclosed what happened

Inquiries established that the incident was confirmed soon afterwards in the Falklands Deployment Book, a souvenir volume of recollections of Invincible's role in the south Atlantic written by officers. Circulated only to crew members in January 1983, six months after the liberation of the Falklands, it says the radar sightings were classified as 'spurious'.

A Royal Navy Sea Harrier fighter was asked to check with its airborne radar 'but could find nothing', the deployment book says. The Exocet hit the Sheffield 19 minutes after the first sighting by Invincible, according to its timetable of sightings.

This crucial series of radar traces was not known to the eminent historian David Brown, formerly of the Royal Navy historical branch, when he wrote what the navy regards as the nearest thing to an official history of the conflict at sea

Mr Brown's book. The Royal Navy and the Falklands War, says that before the attack there were no bogeys [unidentified aircraft assumed to be hostile] on any of the radar screens'.

Mr Brown notes that in previous days a series of radar false alarms had led to British warships being put on full action stations. His history says the Sheffield was first warned by another destroyer when the two Argentine Super Etendard attack planes - with top flying speeds of 733mph - were only 25 miles away. Her own radar was jammed because officers were making a satellite phone call to fleet headquarters in Northwood, London. They ended the call and spotted the Etendards on their radar 20 miles away. False alarms

The planes fired Exocets from 12 miles away. One of them locked on to the Sheffield. It had 'little more than a minute's flying time to reach the Sheffield', Mr Brown says. The only warning given to the crew was a Tannoyed shout: 'Missile attack - hit the deck'.

At the time of the attack the Sheffield sunlucky crew was only in second degree readiness rather than at full action stations", according to another history of the naval conflict. This was 'in order to give the crew a short respite. Electromagnetic interference from [the satellite phone] blanketedher detectiongear". The Exocet did not explode, but its friction caused a fuel explosion which swept the destroyer with flames and poisonous smoke.

David Forster, who now lives in Victoria, Australia, said: 'In the task force we perfected a drill called Red Alpha which closes a ship down into full action stations and battle

Pick up a Penguin — on the Web!

EVEN penguins have joined the high tech world of the Internet!

The world of the web now enables conservation iststo log on to a website to receive messages from 17 rockhopper penguins dotted all over the South West Atlantic up to two-thousand miles into their annual winter migration foraging at sea. After several months at sea, they are now returning to the Falkland Islands to go ashore for the summer breeding season...

It is the latest phase of Falklands Conservation's Satellite Tracking Study of the Winter Migration of Megallanicand RockhopperPenguins breeding in the Falklands, to try to find out why their numbers are declin-

With transmitters taped to their backs, the penguins have been sending back data to a satellite which passes over four times a day in polar orbit, to a base station in Toulouse in France, then to Falklands Conservation. In co-operation with the Saint Andrew's University Sea Mammal Research Unit at Fife in Scotland, they analyse the information which is put on the Internet. Each penguin's transmitter is operated by a sea-water switch, switching off underwater and on when they surface.

The rockhopperpenguins, tagged at three Falklands locations. Seal, Saunders and Sea Lion Islands in March, send back data daily, until the birds return to their colonies to breed in October or until the transmitters fall off. The work is based at Sea Lion Island, close to the 'Special Area of Co-operation' with Argentina for possible oil exploration, and right next to a major fishing area for squid which forms a large part of the rockhopper diet.

The Falklands have the world's largest concentration of rockhopper Penguins and a quarter of the world population of gentoo penguins, with three other breeding species (king, magellanic and macaroni). Penguins are highly vulnerable to oil pollution. entanglement in marine debris and changes in the marine ecosystem. Falkland waters have become an area of large scale commercial fisheries and oil exploration, accompanied by an expansion of tourism and shipping. Recent events have clearly demonstrated the potential threats posed by shipping and oil related activities with oiled penguins coming ashore. Even when ashore, the penguins are becoming more exposed to disturbance from thousands of cruise ship passengers visiting breeding colonies.

This study is a major effort by Falkland Conservation to find out

why there has been such a drastic decline in penguin numbers, down 90 per cent, from three-million rockhopper penguins in the 1930's to only 300.00 today. The reasons remain largely unknown. To find out and identify conservation measures to protect and halt the decline, it is essential to complete a picture of their feeding and migration behaviour. This study provides for the first time valuable insights into winter foraging patterns and migrations.

The three-year project began with a grant from oil companies drilling off the Falkland Islands. It is now run in association with the Antarctic Research Trust by a German Penguin expert. Dr Klemens Putz. aged 39 from Bonn who studied for his Ph.D. degree on Emperor and King Penguins at Kiel University. The project is costing £20.000. Each device costs £1,250, and £10 a day to transmit, staying on for about 100 days. Passengers on cruise ships, on which Dr Putz lectures, have donated up to £1,250 each to adopt and name a penguin, which is why many of the penguins have Swiss or German names. The researchers may next season use more sophisticated tags or use a boat to follow where they go.

This study, now in its third year, forms part of an overall plan to gain more information about the Falklands offshore ecosystem. The performance of each penguin is analysed to find out migration routes and travelling speeds, magellanics are 'long haul' Travellers.

In previous years, it was found that magellanic penguins initially headed north-west swimming either offshore over the Patagonian Shelf or in coastal waters of the South American continent. The magellanic penguins finally reached an area more than 1,800km (1,125 miles) away from the colony. The greatest distance for a single bird was calculated to be 2,661km (1663 miles) in 75 days. Rockhoppers stayed closer to home, though one travelled 2,119 km (1,324 miles) in 75 days. Magellanic penguins travelled at about 35km/day (22miles/day) nearly twice as fast as the smaller rockhopper penguins with average speeds of some 20km/ day (12miles/day).

There is a possibility that both species could be affected if exploration led to big discoveries of offshore oil. How to limit such impact is a challenge facing conservationists. The study has also provided a more precise picture of the areas of the Patagonian Shelf on which these species depend during winter. Harold Briley, MP London

MISSION ANTARCTICA

AN English sailing vessel currently in Argentina and with occasional crossings to Uruguay, is recruiting young men and women to help clear the Antarctic continent of debris, junk and rubbish.

"Mission Antarctica," as this coming season's enterprise has been named, is the fourth of a five season plan to get young people involved in a long term project to preserve the Antarctic continent pristine.

The operation appeals mainly to citizens from countries belonging to the Antarctic Treaty, and the vessel is named 2041, the year when the treaty ensuring a peaceful joint exploration of the continent, and free of nuclear weapons, expires.

The initiative belongs to British born Robert Swan and so far has accomplished the "One step beyond" operation in 1996/97, another fact collecting mission in 97/98, a survey of the semi abandoned Russian Bellinghausen station in 98/99 and this year will begin the recollecting and clearing

operation in Bellinghausen. where tonnes of junk and other debris are accumulated.

In 2001/2002 the actual shipping of 1.000 tons is scheduled to begin.

"We can manage three trips in the season from Ushuaia, carrying ten people at a time. said Captain Mark Hopking of the 67 feet long 2041. The idea is that these young people share the crossing to Antarctica and also participate in the planning of the garbage recollection and dumping in containers to be shipped," added Mr. Hoking.

The British born captain said that the idea is to create young Antarctic-conscious people so that when the Treaty comes up for review in 2041, "they will be decisive and forceful in the conservation of environmental balance of the ice covered continent.

CROWD IN THE FREE SHOP AREA

AT least 10,000 people turned up in the Punta Arenas Free Shop Area after retailers decided to open on Sundays to prop up business and to provide an additional attraction to cruise tourists this coming seas on

According to the local press, from Monday to Friday an average of 6,000 people normally visit the shopping area that is located fifteen minutes from downtown en route to Punta Arenas airport.

Saturday is the big day of the week with 20,000 visitors and when most Punta Arenas residents come for their weekly shopping of foreign goods at reasonable prices.

Although most shoppers applauded the idea of opening on Sundays, which not only means an extra day but also a chance to stroll and look at shops, some believed full success could be achieved if it included games for children and other forms of entertainment for those not so young.

"I believe they should aim at turning the area into a great shopping mall, this could be wonderful for the locals, neighbouring Argentines and tourists," said Josefina Morales, mother of four.

INVESTMENTS IN ARGENTINA TRIPLE

FOREIGN investments in Argentina in 1999 tripled those in 1998, reaching 23.2 billion dollars, and making Argentina second favorite in Latinamercia, behind Brazil but ahead of

A report from the United Nations Trade Development Conference indicates that 1999 was a record foreign investments year for Latinamerica with 90.5 billion

dollars, a 22% jump from 1998. According to "The World Investments Report, privatization in Argentina particularly the sale of the national oil company YPF to Spain's Repsol for 13 billion dollars was one of the main thrust of the investment boom.

Brazil remained the main attraction in Latinamerica with 31 billion US dollars.

Although several Latinamerican countries were undergoing recession during 1999, investors seem to trust long term prospects of the area given the volume of funds involved.

Similarly to Argentina, Chile, in spite of the political and financial situation caused by the Pinochet affair, the collapse of copper prices and the Asian crisis, attracted 9 billion dollars in foreign investments in '99, of which 3.5 billion from the sale of one of the country's main electricity companies to Endesa from Spain.

As far as the future is concerned, according to Wall Street risk assessment agencies, once the "current Argentine administration ratifies the open economy and free markets policies, foreign investors will begin to pour in."

CHEAPER GAS OIL IN **ARGENTINA**

AFTER a four day transport strike that threatened to leave Buenos Aires without cattle and cash in the automatic teller machines, among other vital supplies, the Argentine government and the truckers union signed a truce that includes a 7 US cent cut in the price of diesel and tax reductions.

The agreement that ensures a maximum 45 cents per litre for diesel oil, down from 52 cents, also means that 1,300 trucks blocked in the Argentine-Brazilian border can begin rolling again.

The world famous Liniers livestock market will for the first time in history operate this Saturday to compensate lost trade: influx last Tuesday was down to 97 head of cattle when a normal day moves at least 13,500 head.

However the truce will be

reviewed at the end of the year since trucking companies want some of the benefits granted to single truck owners, extended to the whole industry. Oil companies also will be demanding some sort of compensation for dropping 7 cents of the retail price.

Truckers originally were demanding diesel at 42 cents and the new price will only be available for the trucking

industry

"We've been discussing fuel prices with the companies for some time, and this is the natural consequence of the successful understanding," said Leonardo Aiello, a spokesman for the Argentine presidency.

However in spite of the government's satisfaction about the outcome of the conflict, political analysts said it could turn into an incentive for other groups, particularly the

Camp and farmers.

Argentina's agriculture one of the richest and most efficient in the world is overwhelmed by debts, low international prices and local taxes. Isolated groups of farmers have protested, but so far have been unable to national organize demonstration blocking fresh supplies to cities.

WHALES IN PUNTA VALDĖS

FOR the first time since 1962, the number of identified whales that every year come to the Península Valdés, Argentine Patagonia, to mate and calve is above 1300.

The number is particularly interesting because in 1962 the Soviet whaling fleet caught 1,200 specimens off shore the Chubut province coast.

"They're growing at an annual 7% rate although approximately 20 calves die per season," said Argentine marine biologist and head of the Sea Mammals Section of the Bernardino Rivadavia Natural Sciences Museum, Hugo Castello.

Mr. Castello will be presiding over the coming Third Latinamerican Congress of Sea Mammals Specialists to be held between October 29 and November 3, with the participation of others including Roger Payne, the US scientist who created the photo identificationsystem for whales.

Other specialists include Colombian Jorge Reynolds, Peruvian Julio Reyes and Brazilian Simoes Lopes.

Mr. Castello said that the Valdés whales population is between approximately 4,000 and 5,000 and they roam along

the South American Atlantic coast, all the way from South Georgia and up to Tristan da Cunha Islands and Santa Catarina in Southern Brazil.

"As population increases they might try mating and calving in other protected areas such as Mardel Plata, Rio Negro or even the Uruguayan coast," indicated Mr. Castello who stated that in Spanish colonial times whale population was almost 100,000.

"Whale oil, blubber was used to light the streets of Buenos Aires at that time."

ARGENTINA FOOT AND MOUTH FREE

THE International Organization of Epizooties, (IOE), confirmed Argentina's free of foot and mouth disease status, after a sanitary delegation visited the country for a week to check the impact of the outbreak recently reported and measures taken to combat it.

OIE with offices in Paris which is responsible for extending international certifications, granted Argentina this condition last May, an achievement the country was longing for over half a century.

However the Unites States, Canada and Mexico, Nafta members, have their own sanitary inspection currently visiting Argentina and won't take a decision until after returning to North America. Nafta has become Argentina's main beef client and suspended imports of fresh beef when the outbreak of foot and mouth disease was first reported.

The outbreak apparently originated in Paraguay, and was introduced into Argentina and the south of Brazil with smuggled cattle.

In the south of Brazil the epidemic is still not under control and authorities have so far applied the sanitary rifle to 8,500 head of cattle, sheep and pigs.

Nevertheless Brazilian officials believe they have identified what they believe are the "crucial" areas and have set up a strict sanitary ring.

Meanwhile Peru has identified three areas with outbreaks of the foot and mouth A virus and has established strict quarantines.

"We believe there are 14,000 head of cattle potentially vulnerable, and we will act with utmost determination," said Dr. Violeta Díaz head of the Peruvian Livestock Sanitary Department.

"This is a terrible blow for us since we're working to eradicate the disease and obtain international certification," added Dr. Violeta Diaz.

MONEY LAUNDERING

MERCOSUR'S four full members agreed in Brasilia to coordinate Central Bank actions and procedures to prevent financial institutions from involving in money laundering.

After a three day meeting in Brazil during the last week of September, the spokesperson for the task group, Ambassador Elbio Rosselli said that the agreement contemplates three main fields of action, police, Justice and Central banks.

According to the agreement Central Banks will demand financial institutions to identify all clients involved in financial services, particularly above a certain amount of money.

However Ambassador Rosselli indicated that the agreement will respect the banking rules of each member country.

122 BILLION US DOLLAR INVESTMENT

DIRECT foreign investment in Mercosur between 1995 and 1999 reached 122 billion US dollars according to a Price/Waterhouse/Coopers report released this week in Montevideo.

Attracted by political and economic stability, deregulation, the opening of economies and abundant natural and human resources, foreign companies invested heavily in the privatisation of Mercosur public utilities and private companies mainly through mergers and acquisitions.

However the flow during the five years under consideration has not been steady, but now after two years of slight retraction caused by the 97/98 international financial crisis, investors are once again eager to come to Mercosur.

According to the report, most of the 122 billion US dollars in direct investments went to Brazil with 83 billion; Argentina followed with 23 billion and Uruguay 3 billion.

In Brazil a total of 3,286 companies changed hands during the period, of which 76% were absorbed by foreign investors.

In Argentina, United States was the main investor with a 38% participation followed by Spain 25%, France 8% and Chile

United States was also the main investor in Uruguay with 35%, Mercosur 30% and Europe 28%.

WOOL REPORT for the week ending Friday, September 29

Prompted by keen demand early in the week for super fine wool of 17 and 18 microns in Newcastle, the Australian Eastern Market Indicator gained five cents on Tuesday and three cents on Wednesday before going six cents lower on Thursday due to inadequate support for broader microns. The EMI thus closed the week up two cents at 728 A cents per

In South Africa the BKB Market Indicator lost 3 cents (0.1 percent) to

close at 2483 SA cents/kg clean
New Zealand's wool indices had a reversal of fortune. The Fine Indicator lost 21 cents to 1736 NZ cents, the Medium Indicator lost 14 cents to 586 NZ cents whilst the Strong Indicator dropped 17 cents to 443 NZ cents.

Currencies

At time of writing the Australian dollar was almost ten cents weaker this week at 2.71 AS/£ whilst the New Zealand dollar was another 11 cents weaker at 3.61 NZS/£. Such movements in the currency markets are having a real impact on the wool market indices and reducing the value of wool in sterling terms. "A key factor influencing wool buying at the moment is the weakness of the Australian dollar, which reached record lows against the US dollar last week. Depreciation of the Australian currency against sterling also outweighed advances in physical wool prices, resulting in a few pence being shaved off the price of wool tops' (YP)

"The short term outlook remains positive with local (UK) processors generally busy and the primary market expected to record further gains as supply shortages and competition for good quality finer wools keep prices buoyant." (YP)

continued from page 1 readiness in four minutes.

Men are at their radar displays or manning their guns. Most are at their fire-fighting stations. You could defend yourself against any attack. You could dodge and weave, turning at the last moment to confuse an attacking missile.

I could have given those men on the Sheffield more than four times four minutes if only I'd stood up and said 'Alert the fleet' after getting those contacts on my screen. I had the time to do it. I should have been strong enough to break the chain of command, even if it meant getting my arse kicked.

'I have carried the shame of that day with me and will do until I die.

The man sitting next to him in Invincible's ops room, Mark Booth, 37, son of a Royal Navy signals operator and now a professional golfer who lives in Buckingham, said his memory fully confirmed Mr Forster's account of the radar contacts.

They were absolutely crystal clear contacts. I was adamant that they were true contacts. I would have bet my house on them. Hostile

aircraft After we reported them, they went on to a universal screen in the ops room with the symbol HA for hostile aircraft, the number of the contact and a line plotting the aircrafts approach to the task force. A lot of people had that on their screens.

But he did not recall any remark by an officer about 'chasing rabbits' and disagreed with Mr Forster on the issue of guilt. 'We did exactly what we trained for in reporting the contacts. It was for other people in the ops room to act on that information. It is every ship's job to make the rest of the fleet aware of such things

Invincible was closer to those contacts and smaller ships don't have the same radar. Any responsibility is on other people's shoulders, not David's. If he had made a fuss in the ops room, he would simply have been treated as hysterical. I feel no guilt at all and David should not. Although we were only 19 at the time, we were very, well trained. We were very good at our jobs. We had the fast reactions that young people often have on electronic matters.

The MoD spokesman said: David Forster must not blame himself. The buck stops somewhere. Someone else had to make that decision. The Sheffield incident was the Royal Navy's first encounter with low-flying, Exocet-carrying attack planes. Many positive lessons had been learned from it, especially in warship design.

The destroyer's fire-gutted hulk finally sank six days after the attack. This Argentine success - coming only two days after the British sinking of the cruiser General Belgrano, with more than 300 Argentine deaths doomed diplomatic negotiations and established the Falklands conflict inescapably as a shooting war.

In May 1983, the next of kin of the Sheffield dead were taken by helicopter to the place where she sank so they could cast wreaths into

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What is the Poppy Appeal

What is the Royal British

Legion Poppy Appeal? FLANDERS and Picardy saw some of the worst fighting and devastation during the First World War with men fighting, living and dying in a sea of mud. The one thing that did survive this devastation was the Poppy, its vibrant springtime colour giving hope to those soldiers who fought in the trenches

In 1921 the Royal British Legion adopted the Poppy as its symbol and sold artificial poppies to raise money to help ex servicemen and women and their dependants in times of need. The Poppy Appeal is still active today and plays a vital role in the welfare of ex-servicemen and women, particularly those wounded in the various wars - the First World War, the Second World War, Korea Cyprus, the Gulf and the Falklands War. The Falkland Islands Branch of the Royal British Legion can normally raise around £1,200 each year for the Poppy Appeal.

As an example of the scale of funds that are required, this £1,200 will pay to keep one person in hos-

pital for three days.

There are many hundreds of people who need constant care and hospitalisation, perhaps you can see from this example the vast amount of money needed.

What is the two minutes silence?

On Remembrance Day we always observe a two minutes silence during the service at the memorial. This is normally done at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month and marks the signing of the armistice ending the First World War. It is a time of reflection, to remember all those who have given their lives in the service of their country so that we, today, may live in peace and freedom.

The Royal British Legion is campaigning to return the two minutes silence to the actual day of remembrance. This year it falls on Saturday the Eleventh of Novem-

We ask everyone to stop what they are doing at eleven of clock and observe the two minutes silence

"Archealogical triumph" for Islander Mensun

THREE hundred pieces of blue and white priceless Ming porcelain have been sitting at the bottom of the sea for the past 500 years and a Falkland Islander directed the operation to bring them to the sur-

Mensun Bound (46) was the diver who actually located the centre of the wreck which contained the perfectly preserved hoard worth millions of pounds.

The porcelain will be auctioned over 30 weeks on the internet this month. Prices are expected to range from a modest £30 to more than £30,000 for collectors items.

If the porcelain hoard is extraordinary its history is even more improbable.

Some time in the 15th century a Vietnamese junk, heavily laden with pricelessporcelainand ceramics was overwhelmed by heavy seas and sank in deep water about 15 miles off the coast of Vietnam.

The vessel lay undisturbed until the 1990s when fishermen started bringing up Ming objects in their nets.

British and Vietnamese archeologists began the slow and dangerous operation to recover the wreck. Their project was shrouded in secrecy for fear of pirates prowling for treasure in the area of the ship wreck just off Hoi An, a port town in central Vietnam near Da Nang

The three-summer archaeological operation was directed by Mr Bound, a fellow of St. Peter's College Oxford. He describes the project as a technical and archaeological triumph and the most costly recovery since the Mary Rose.

Mr Bound said, "It is remarkable to think that for a few years in the 15th century the most exciting pottery in the world was coming from a few peasant villages wedged between the dykes and paddy fields of the Red River delta. Then to see all this pottery laid out in rows just as it was when the ship went down - the thrill of that went right through me."

The Vietnamese government will keep all the pottery of archaeological or art-historical significance plus a selection of every type of pot on board. Part of the auction's profits will go towards the costs of salvage, displaying the relics in museums and scholarly publications. (Source The Times).

Ingredients

Harge onion

I tsp cumin seeds

half inch einnamon stick

4 cloves

4 peppercorns

I cardamon (slit, but don't remove the seeds).

2 bay leaves

I tsp garam masala

1 tsp salt

half lb. peas

8 oz. rice

Method

Slice the onion thinly.

Fry with the whole spices. Add rice and fry too.

Add salt and garam masala. Add 450ml boiling water, peas and simmer for 15 minutes on low

heat with the lid on.

Boil off the last of the water if necessary.

Weather summary for September

THE weather for September was much colder and duller than average with much higher snowfall, rainfall and hail.

Temperature

The average maximum temperature for the month was 4.9C much lower than the long term average of 7.3C. The highest recorded temperature was 11.2C on the 26th, while a high of only -2.0C was the lowest recorded during the month on the 12th.

The average minimum temperature for the month was -0.9C, well below the long term mean of 0.7C. The lowest minimum was -7.0C on the 12th. There were 24 nights with air frost and 28 nights with ground frost.

Rainfall

Rainfall was well above average, 58.2mm compared to 33.6mm. The greatest amount in a day was 19.3mm on the 12th. There were 19 days with 0.1mm or more and 11 days with 1.0mm or more.

Snow

Snow fell on 19 days of the month and lay on 11; the greatest depth was 7cm measured on the 13th.

Sunshine

The total sunshine recorded was 100.6 hours, and the long term average for September 130.7 hours.

Wind/Gales

The mean wind for the month was 15.0kt slightly below the average monthly mean of 15.8kt. Gales (34kt or more over a ten minute period) occurred on six days. The highest gust recorded was 56kt on the 28th and gusts exceeding 33kt occurred on 14 days, the average being 17.1 days.

The early use of metered cards!

THE installation of home electric meters that require the purchase of a plastic eard from a retail outlet, that is a prepayment for the goods we are about to use, would seem to be a revolutionary new idea.

However, like many new schemes it in fact a re-introduction of an older practice.

Tokens have been used throughout history as a prepayment for goods delivered, for discount against future purchases or for identifying the value of purchases prior to profit sharing.

Usually they are made from a material that is cheaper than the coinage they represent and are identified by slogans or logos of the company or store that issued them.

Tokens made of brass and about the same size of a coin have been found inscribed 'Globe Hotel. Stanley' and have a face value of 3d and 4d.

Many examples exist of tokens used in pubs throughout England and Wales in the late 19th century, when the price of a pint of beer was 3d or 4d, depending on quality.

Typically they would be used within the establishment in lieu of money and usually used to 'pay' the landlord for the use of meeting room or game facilities.

In the case of use of the meeting room, the secretary of the society would purchase of number of tokens from the licensee before the meeting, each person would be given a token which was for spending at the bar on refreshments.

This ensured that the landlord was compensated for the use of the room, and no one could enjoy the evening without spending money.

The practice still exists in many pubs and clubs of the pay out from gambling machines being tokens that can only be spent in the same establishment.

Tokens have been used to record purchases made in a store over time. In later years they were replaced by stamps and coupons.

Thin tinned iron tokens have been identified with the Falklands Cooperative Store.

Probably issued in their hundreds, today few examples survive.

Along with their demise is the exact nature of their use.

We can assume the purpose form similar situations elsewhere, but equally, tokens could have been used for a peculiar local purpose. As an early replacement for the carrying of cash and the need for a bank to regulate currency exchange?

Perhaps we invented the first credit card!



Condemnation from Councillors: Governor to meet Di Tella

FALKLAND ISLANDS councillors have raised strong objections to plans for His Excellency the Covernor Mr Donald Lamont to personally greet Dr Guido Di Tella. Former Argentine Foreign Minister, when he arrives in the Islands tomorrow

When Dr Di Tella first expressed his intention to visit the Islands last year, councillors agreed he should receive no preferential treatment and should be dealt with as, " other tourist

However, Governor Lamont made public his plans earlier this week during an interview with Tony Burnett on the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station's (FIBS) new 'One to One" programme

Governor Lamont stated he intends to meet Dr Di Tella at Mount Pleasant and to have him for an "informal" dinner at Government House

Mr Lamont admitted his actions would be likely to cause. "_considerable unease amongst many Islanders." and he acknowledged that Di Tella was the ex-foreign minster of a country which,"has a claim to this territory which hangs as a cloud over the political, social, and economic develop-ment of the Falklands. He is also seen as an architect of the blockade, the disruptions to the air-links last year.

Howeverhe justified his intentions saying. "Dr Di Tella was, for many years, a foreign Minister of Argentina, with whom British Foreign Secretaries conducted successful business. His president at the time and he were received at Buckingham Palace when President Menem made a visit to London. I have to act in a way that reflects

that kind of status

"Also I think that here we have to bear in mind the signals that we will send to Argentina about his visit and about how he is regarded. I think that the major step forward in the Di Tella era was that he recognised a need to understand the point of view of Falkland Islanders. That was a significant step in developing the kind of understanding that has been lacking in the relationship, and which really we have to take forward

if we are to remove the tensions that exist in the relationships in this part of the South Atlantic

The Agreement which was reached last July contains a reflection of Argentine acknowledgement that there exists an institution called the Falkland Islands Legislative Council. And, it was the policy of Dr. Di Tella to try to understand the views of elected councillors and to take them into account in the policy he was following. Now that's short of any kind of official recognition but it was a very important step forward in helping us towards an agreement that has proved to be to the benefit of the Islands and has been good over-all for the relationship in the South Atlantic

I think someone who made that step forward which was certainly controversial in Argentina, we want to recognise the importance of the step. So, that's why, while I recognise that there would be many unhappy that I should be at the airport and offer dinner at Government House. I think it's important that I do so. There is certainly no concession on any matter of substance in these actions and I think that it serves as sending a signal that someone who has been willing to recognisethe importance of Islander opinion has shown the way in which relationships in the South Atlantic can best be managed.

Wrong message

Falkland Islands councillors were quick to speak out against Mr. Lamont's intentions. Councillor Richard Cockwell told Penguin News, "I have no problem with Dr. Di Tella visiting as a tourist to increase his understanding and knowledge of the Falkland Islands or even have a pleasant holiday. However I do believe that His Excellency the Governor welcoming him on his arrival at MPA gives the wrong message to Argentina and the people of the Falkland Islands. It has to be made quite clear that he is doing so as a representative of the FCO and not as the representative of the Falkland Islands Government and people.
"We must never forget that Dr. Di

Tella - no matter how it was dressed up with smiles and gifts - was the Foreign Secretary of a government when they enshrined their claim to the Falkland Islands in their constitution and reinforced their wish to deny Falkland Islanders the right to determine their own future

'I have no qualms in meeting representatives of the Argentine Government to explain this right but I would not wish to raise the profile of what should be a quiet personal visit by an ex minister of the Argentine Government."

Councillor Norma Edwards reiterated this view in an interview with FIBS on Wednesday. She said, "I do feel that the Governor goingto MPA and meeting him (Di Tella) and having him to dinner at Government House puts a different slant on things. It will be seen as Di Tella's victory parade.

"I don't think it's good for the Falkland Islands, certainly not for the future of the Falkland Islands. I do not think we have anything to celebrate about Di Tella's arrival. He should come as a visitor, as he intended to do, and that's it

Sad and depressing

Councillor William Luxton yesterday expressed his disapproval in a letter to the Governor. He wrote. "I particularly object to the fact that you took this arbitrary decision without any consultation with councillors whatever. I find it very sad and depressing that you felt it necessary to do it that way but no doubt it was because you knew that the vast majority of Falkland Islanders and councillors alike would object strongly

Councillors have been saying that Di Tella should be treated as an ordinary tourist and the whole visit kept as low profile as possible. By deciding to raise it to a VIP welcome ceremony you have undermined this objective completely. I believe it also sends entirely the wrong message to

the Argentines."

Court News

TURNERS GCMS employee Howard James Sampson, 59, appeared in court on Wednesday to answer a charge of being in control of a Landrover having consumed alcohol in quantities greater than the prescribed limit. Sampson entered a guilty plea to the charge.

Inspector Len McGill prosecuting told the court that on the night of September 3, a mobile police patrol had discovered a Landrover parked at a sharp angle near to the entrance to the Police Station.

The vehicle engine was running and the defendant was in the driver's seat.

Sampson was arrested and a breath analysis carried out, the result of which was a lower reading of 69micrograms of alcohol per 100 millilitres of breath.

Defence lawyer Hugh Ferguson told the court the defendant had travelled to Stanley from Mount Pleasant with colleagues, one of whom was a designated driver for the evening.

He explained the designated driver had disappeared during the evening and one of Sampson's colleagues had been taken to hospital so the defendant drove to the police station to seek assistance in looking for the driver.

The defendant also intended to ask if he could leave the vehicle at the station.

Chief Magistrate Keith Watson fined Sampson £400 for the offence and disqualified him from driving for twelve months. He was also ordered to pay £35 prosecution costs.

The last sixteen saw some entertaining matches with two in particular going to the fifth and deciding leg. Colin Smith had another lucky escape and beat his younger brother Russell; Gary Hewitt came under great pressure from Terry Clifton before finding the winning

The quarter final line up was therefore:

A history of the Island Games and Falklands participation

THE ISLAND GAMES, sometimes mistakenly called the 'Small' Island Games, began in 1985 as the 'Inter-Island Games' and as part of the Isle of Man International Year of Sport and were intended to be a one-off sporting celebation only.

Geoffrey Corlett who became the first Games Director, contacted not only the Islands surrounding Great Britain but encouraged the Scandinavians. Greenland, Iceland, Faroes, St Helena and others to participate.

Initially 15 Islands, with 600 competitors and officials took part in 7 sports, with the total cost of staging the Games being put at 70.000 pounds. The track and field events were held on an 8 lane grass track, a far cry from next year's Games which the Isle of Man will host for the second time, and which now boasts a new synthetic track in a stadium capable of holding 10.000 spectators. So successful were the Games of '85 that it was decided to hold a similar event 2 years later.

The 1987 Games were held on the Channel Island of Guernsey by which time the number of Islands competing had increased to 18, the number of sports to 9 and the number of competitors and officials to more than 1.000. The successful staging of the 2nd Games led to the formation of the Island Games Association (IGA) with Geoffrey Corlett being nominated as the first Secretary, and an Executive Committee established. The IGA remain the Governing body and their Constitution provides the guidlines for all competing Islands.

The 1989 Games on the Faroe Islands, which lie midway between Iceland and Norway but which belong to Denmark, saw a slight drop in participation to 15 Islands and 800 competitors and officials in 11 sports. Because the Faroes have few hotels, competitors were required to sleep in school halls and floors.

Despite the increasing Islands membership the Games were still relatively unknown and it was in the early 90's that the Falklands, having already taken part in the 1982, 1986 and 1990 Commonwealth Games, were made aware of the Island Games.

Burned Peck travelled to Aaland (a Finnish Island where the population speak only Swedish) in 1991, as an 'observer' and his application for Falklands membership was overwhelmingly accepted by the IGA. By now the number of sports featured in the Games had risento 13, while schools were used again to provide sleeping quarters for some competitors.

In 1993 the first Falklandsteam.

travelling by RAF Tri Star, coach and then ferry, were welcomed to the Isle of Wight, with participants in Athletics, Badminton, Golf, Shooting and Netball which was held as a Demonstration Sport.

The accommodation facilities had by then improved to chalet type and the Falklands team made particular friends with sportsmen and women from Saaerma (Estonia), the Shetland Islands and Angelessy who were staying in the same hotel.

The standard of competition was somewhat higher than expected but nevertheless the Falklands ladies team of Tracy Porter and Donna Williams combined to take a bronze medal in the Half-Marathon.

The 1995 Games in Gibraltar attracted a small Falklands team of 3 - Clay Pigeon shooting and Ladies Half Marathon - as most of the sporting clubs concentrated their efforts on the 1997 Island Games on the Channel Island of Jersey.

Until 1997 the Games had attracted little public or media interest, but the Jersey Organising Committee embarked upon a huge marketing campaign which resulted in thousands attending the Opening and Closing Ceremonies, while a Television Documentary was filmed and screened on Channel LV

The Falklands participation was highlighted in a double page spread in the Daily Telegraph so bringing International recognition to the Islands through its sportsmen and women. The team did not disappoint either with a clutch of medals being won by the shooters on an almost daily basis.

The McCallum brothers Tim and Chris shocked the Isle of Wight team in the full-bore pairs competition, making up an 11 point deficit on the final day, to snatch the silver medal, while Chris also took a bronze in the Queen's Prize competition.

In Pistol events Graham Didlick and David Peck won silver and several bronze medals providing a tremendous boost to the Falklands golfers, badminton players, athletes and swimmers. Graham and David took the NPA Service Pistol B pairs silver medal and a further 2 bronze medals, while Graham also took home an individual bronze.

The young Falklands swimmers all achieved personal bests (p b's) while the Badminton pair of Nicky Luxton and Douglas Clarke scored a notable victory over a Gibraltarian pair in the consolation play-offs.

FIOGA were very fortunate in obtaining 50% of the competitors fares through the generosity of Falk-

"Reconciliation" says former Argentine President

THERE are two wretched words in the entire Argentine history; success and failure.

The sum is zero, because the concepts are balanced; the lives of the peoples are not a like competition.

Slowly in the fog of the desert island, one soldier approaches another: they look at each other but do not know if they must shoot. Something - perhaps Somebody - saves their lives.

More than fifteen years after that, they meet again in Saint Paul's Cathedral and something - perhaps Somebody - reconciles them forever.

That's why, the worthy synthesis of defeat and victory is a mature reconciliation.

By dint of triumphs which cost blood, whole peoples disappear. As Pirro said: "Another victory like this and I am lost."

I am pleased to recall, along with the Malvinas Islands inhabitants, my trip to Great Britain which is now included in history as an effort for reconciliation, where we talked about peace. It is never enough and we stated to all the British institutions whom we visited that we had to talk about the Malvinas.

As a result of these proposals they recognised a fact impossible



to ignore; the British Government expressly mentioned the successive UN's recommendations to discuss Malvinese sovereignty.

The first page of the London newspaper Evening Standard surprised me by saying, "Because it's time to talk about Malvinas."

Max Hastings. Malvina's correspondent during the war, wrote: "We should mature and soon talk about the Islands sovereignty."

Also we have to honour together the memory of the Argentine and British war dead.

In this point there is no privi-

lege in nationality*: innocent boys died because drunken governments played to win and lose.

Because of that I prayed with my daughter in front of the two hundred and fifty-five British mortal remains.

Their mothers, fathers, brothers and sisters deserve Argentine respect; the same we demand for us from the British.

The relations established by my government with the United Kingdom are solid; we communicate with the Monarch, the Premier, Parliamentary and Businessmen, we sign agreements of commerce, investments, sports, transport, education, space and academic activities.

Labour and Conservative parties received us to discuss questions of special interests for both Nations.

In our country, we agree with the opposition party currently in power, that the relationship with the United Kingdom is a matter of state.

With the British we talked about reconciliation and peace; it is the same message I want to leave the Islanders, so near to our land, nearby our coast and I also want to leave our wishes to harmonize interests.

From 1989 I reconstructed Argentine international relations. It was not possible to do this prior to then as the Argentina of the 80's decade did not exist in the world.

I know there is much to do and the effort it needs.

Near is the day that Islanders and Argentines talk frankly about their common destiny.

*Dr. Menem's exact words were In this point there can't be nationality privileges.

General Practice with Dr Barry Elsby

GENERAL PRACTICE is, without a doubt, the most important part of the Medical Services in the Falkland Islands.

It is the cornerstone of Primary Care, working closely with the Health Visitor, District Nurses, Physiotherapist, Speech & Language Therapist, Counsellor etc. to improve the health and well being of the community.

In all parts of Britain. General Practice is facing increasing demand, with pressure on appointments, and the Falklands is no different. In fact our consultation rate is probably higher than for the same size population in England.

With civilianisation of our Surgical Services, leading to the Surgeon and Anaesthetist providing some Casualty cover, we have been able to increase the time we devote to General Practice consultations but if the service is to run efficiently, it is important that patients use it correctly.

Unfortunately, all too frequently appointments are taken up with problems that are "self limiting" i.e. with problems that just get better on their own and for which GP's can do no more than the patient themselves. By this I mean conditions such as simple common colds, sore throats, sprains, pulled musclesetc. In many cases the persons concerned have not tried any simple remedies before coming to the clinic.

We are not trying to stop people attending clinics but we are trying to reduce the waiting time, and at the same time improve people's knowledge so that they can better cope.

As I mentioned above, Casualty is now partly covered by the Surgeon and Anaesthetist. These are highly skilled consultants, experts at treating Accidents& Emergencies.

I know they will agree with me when I say that they are not trained in, and have no experience of treating General Practice problems.

The only people who should attend Casualty are those with an accident that has happened within the previous 24 hours or a true medical emergency. We will be closely monitoring our appointments system over the next three months, recording the next available routine appointments etc. on a daily basis. At the end of this period, matters will be reviewed.

Over the coming twelve months. Penguin News will be featuring weekly articles on health issues which we hope will help people deal better with these minor problems at home and so ease pressure on our clinic appointments.

They will also focus on ways we can improve our general health, by looking at exercise, smoking, diet, alcohol etc. Copies of the weekly articles will be available from the GP Reception Desk.

It is surprising how many people do not have a medicine chest at home

The following list is a guide as to what a home medicine chest should contain.

- Thermometer
- Paracetamol Syrup (Calpol. Dispol etc) for pain or fever in children. The dose range will be on the bottle.
- Paracetamol, Aspirin.
 Neurofen etc. for adults and teenagers with headaches, sore throats, colds, fevers, sprains, cuts etc.
- Simple Cough Syrup.
- Menthal Crystals or Vicks type compounds. Used in hot water and inhaling the steam will help with sinus problems, blocked noses and dry coughs.
- Antiseptic Creams or lotions for grazes etc.
- Calamine Lotion for itch. stings, bites etc.
- A range of plasters for cuts
- A range of banadages for cuts etc.
- Tweezers for removing splinters

This week we will discuss sore throat and its treatment

Sore throat (pharyngitis) is very common. It is nearly always due to a virus infection. Soreness in the throat may be the only symptom. In addition, one or more of the following symptoms may occur. A hoarse voice, a mild cough, a raised temperature (fever), headache and feeling tired. The glands in the neck may swell (they are fighting off the virus). Swallowing may be painful. A sore throat may also develop with a cold or 'flu like illness. A sore throat typically becomes worse over 2-3 days and then eases and goes, usually within a week

Tonsillitis is an infection of the tonsils at the back of the mouth. Symptoms are similar to a sore throat but may be more severe. In particular, any fever and general feeling of being unwell tend to be worse. The glands in the neck commonly enlarge. Pus can often be seen on the enlarged red tonsils. Glandular fever, a viral infection is a possibility if tonsillitis is severe or prolonged.

Treatment of sore throat and tonsillitis:

- No treatment at all is an option as many sore throats are mild and soon go away.
- Drink plenty of fluids it is tempting not to drink much if swallowing is painful. This may lead to mild dehydration, particularly if there is also a fever. Mild dehydration can make headaches and tiredness much

worse. Cold drinks and ice cream often help to sooth the throat.

- Aspirin gargles may ease the soreness. Dissolve some aspirin in water and gargle for 3-4 minutes. This can be done 3-4 times a day. This is often most useful before meals and at bedtime. The aspirin can then be swallowed for further relief of any pain, headache or fever. (Aspirin should not be given to children under 12 years)
- Paracetamol is an alternative to ease pain, headache and fever. It can be given to children as a medicine (such as Calpol, Disprol etc). Some people prefer to gargle with aspirin as the local effect on the throat may be better than paracetamol. They then spit it out and take paracetamol for general relief of pain and fever. This is because aspirin may cause an upset stomach.
- Ibuprofen (Neurofen) is useful in teenagers and adults.
- TCP and salt water gargles are useful in some people

Do I need an antibiotic?

Usually not The vast majority of infections causing a sore throat or tonsillitis are due to virus germs. Antibiotics kill bacteria but do not kill viruses. Some throat and tonsil infections are due to bacteria



However, an antibiotic is not thought to make much difference even if bacteria cause the throat or tonsil infection. The body normally fights off throat and tonsil infections quickly whether due to a virus or bacteria. Antibiotics can sometimes cause side effects such as diarrhoea, rash and stomach upsets. An antibiotic may be advised if the infection is particularly severe, if it is not easing after a few days or if the immune system is not working properly (such as people without a spleen, people on chemotherapy etc).

Occasionally a throat or tonsil infection is due to a rare cause. Consider consulting a doctor if:

- symptoms are severe or are unusual and different to those described above.
- symptoms are not heginning to settle within 4-5 days.



Penguins of the Falkland Islands and South America

BIOLOGICAL SURVEYOR Mike Bingham of the Environmental Research Unit has produced a simple but stunning book entitled, Penguns of the Falkland Islands and South America

Brigham explores the world of the penguin utilising easy to understand language accompanied by beautiful visual images of the animals. He explains, "This book aims to provide a general insight into the world of penguins, as well as to present current data on populations sizes, distribution, physiology and life strategies.

"Only species found around South America and the Falkland Islands are specifically covered, although much of the general infor-



mation relating to penguins will also apply to species from other regions. I hope the book will be of interest to people from all walks of life and I have tried to present the information in an easily readable form. Nevertheless, the data contained within the book also provides a useful reference for those involved in penguin research and conservation."


Throughout the book Bingham details the work carried out by the Environmental Research Unit, explaining the motivation of the organisation. Thave always believed that in order to understand the damage that humans can cause to the environment, it is necessary to understand what exists prior to such disturbance.

In the case of penguins for example, it would be hard to determine to what degree penguins are being affected by human activities, such as oil pollution and fishing, without knowing how many penguins there are, where they live, what they feed on and so forth.

"After two years of general research and observation. I set about taking a census of penguin populations throughout the Falkland Islands (1995/96) and southern South America (1996/97). These surveys provided the missing data on population sizes and distribution and form the basis upon which our ongoing research programmes are now built."



BOEING 767 TO PUNTA ARENAS

LAN CHILE this week incorporated its top international flight aircraft, the Boeing 767 into one of its daily Santiago Punta Arenas runs.

As part of its modernisation programme Lan Chile will be introducing from now until 2003, the Airbus A340-300, which will cover international flights to Europe and United States.

According to Paola Cortado, Lan-Chile-Ladeco Regional General Manager, the Punta Arenas flight leaving Santiago at 11:00 hours, with a stop in Puerto Montt will now be covered with a 220 seat Boeing 767.

"Besides more capacity including 5 first class seats and 28 in executive, the 767 has greater reclining space plus individual televisions," said Ms. Cortado, adding that, "...it's a real top class aircraft, a privilege for Magallanes".

TOTAL EXPOSURE TO OZONE HOLE

PUNTA ARENAS became the first populated location totally exposed to the dangerous ozone hole that this year also reached a record extension of 29.3 million square kilometres, according to NASA and New Zealand scientific reports.

Apparently during September 9 and 10, Punta Arenas residents were directly exposed to extremely intense ultra violet rays since the ozone hole was perpendicular over the city.

This kind of exposure can cause skin cancer in humans, serious eye injuries and destroy the minuscule organic elements that are the initiation of the food chain.

"With time the chances of populated areas being exposed to minimum levels of ozone will become greater", said Dr. Dean Peterson from the New Zealand Water and Atmospheric Research Institute Antarctic team.

Peterson added that segments of the ozone hole could affect Argentina, South Africa, Australia and New Zealand.

Apparently extremely low temperatures in the stratosphere were responsible for the unexpected spring expansion of the phenomenon, but conditions should improve towards the end of November, beginning of December as we approach the austral summer.

Experts believe that even if the emission of elements that

destroy ozone continues to decrease, it will take at least another two decades for a significant recovery.

"Even if ozone gradually recovers we still will be exposed to climatic variations during the next ten years," explained Dr. Peterson.

PINOCHET'S ABORTED COUP

CHILE this week commemorated the twelfth anniversary of the 1988 plebiscite that was a turning point in recent Chilean history, clearing the way for a return to democracy and an end to the then fifteen years of military dictatorship.

However, in one of the many television programmes remembering the anniversary, a former Air Force member of the Junta confirmed what most Chileans long had suspected happened the night after the polls were closed: a desperate attempt from Pinochet to ignore the plebiscite and continue in power

Former Air Force commander Fernando Matthei revealed that that very night, October 5, Pinochet convened the other members of the Junta to Government House requesting them to sign a bill delegating all powers in the general.

Mr. Matther and Navy commander Toribio Merino flatly refused to sign, and were immediately joined by the fourth member. representing the Carabineros.

"Under no circumstances will we sign the bill nor accept sending troops to the streets, we told the general who warned he would go ahead by himself anyway," said Matthei.

"Fortunately the Minister of Internal Affairs and myself had publicly admitted defeat, 54% to 45%, before the meeting, but anyhow it cost the Chief of Staff a heart attack, so tense was the meeting," recalled the former Air Force chief.

The plebiscite was to decide whether General Pinochet was to stay another eight years, but in spite of previous favourable opinion polls, the result was contrary to his ambition.

Army tanks never rolled out, and two years later, March 1990, Patricio Aylwin became the first civilian elected president of Chile since 1970 when Socialist Salvador Allende's victory, that ended in the bloody September 1973 coup.

Sir Nigel Essenhigh to be the new First Sea Lord

A ROYAL NAVY officer well known for his pride in his Geordie roots and who rides a motorbike to work has been appointed Britain's First Sea Lord, the most senior position in the Navy.

From next January, Admiral Sir Nigel Essenhigh, 55, will take over from Admiral Sir Michael Boyce as chief of naval staff when the latter becomes chief of the defence staff, replacing General Sir Charles Guthrie.

Sir Nigel will be responsible for the operational effectiveness of the fleet.

Joining the Navy in 1963 straight from school, he qualified as a principal warfare officer in 1972, with a specialist knowledge in navigation.

After promotion to Commander in 1980, he joined the Ministry of Defence for duty with Naval Manpower Training, before he took command of HMS Nottingham in 1982.

He joined HMS Ark Royal, which was under construction, in 1984, and was promoted to Captain in 1985.

Graduating from the Royal College of Defence Studies in 1987, he returned to the MoD and the naval plans department.

But in 1991, he saw active service in the Gulf war in the course of a three- year stint in command of HMS Exeter.

He was promoted to Rear Admiral in 1994, and then took up the appointment of Hydrographer of the Navy.

Within two years he moved to Assistant Chief of Defence Staff (Programmes) before being promoted to Admiral and becoming Commander in Chief Fleet in 1998.

Also appointed yesterday was Air Chief Marshal Sir Anthony Bagnall. 55, who becomes vice-chief of Defence Staff next May, in succession to Admiral Sir Peter Abbott. Both he and Sir Nigel will be members of the Defence Council.

Sir Anthony joined the Royal Air Force as a Cranwell cadet in 1974, and following flying training he flew Lightning, Phantom and Tornado F3 aircraft, and commanded 43 and 23 squadrons- and later. RAF Leuchars and 11 Group. He took up his current post as Commander in Chief Strike Command this year.

Vice Admiral Sir Alan West, 52. Chief of Defence Intelligence, will succeed Sir Nigel as Commander in Chief Fleet.

His career includes being Commanding Officer of HMS Ardent, - known as the forgotten Frigate of the Falklands War - that was sunk in action on May 21 1982 with the loss of 22 of the 199 crew, after supporting the landing of British troops in the Falkland Islands.

FORMER AGENT ON TRIAL

SOME of the long tentacles of the repressive system during Pinochet's time will be exposed in Buenos Aires this week with the beginning of the trial of a former Chilean Intelligence agent allegedly associated in the killing of a former Chilean Army Commander and his wife exiled in Argentina in 1974.

General Carlos Arturo Pratts, who as Commander of the Army had a significant role in legally supporting president Allende had left for Argentina and was trying to fly to Europe, but the Chilean Embassy in Buenos Aires would not extend him and his wife new passports.

One night in Palermo. Buenos Aires, the couple were killed with a bomb that went off in their car.

Facing trial as a coconspirator in the attack is former Chilean intelligence agent Enrique Lautaro Arancibia Clavel who was accused by another former agent. American born Michael Townley, as the man responsible for the logistics of the Buenos Aires information gathering and operation.

Arancibia Clavel denies the charges, but Townley, currently living in the US under a witness protection program, and who confessed his responsibility in three overseas attacks, in Buenos Aires, Rome and Washington, (killing former Chilean Minister Orlando Letelier and his American secretary), insists in his former aide's involvement.

"This is a set up against General Pinochet and I'm the hostage," Arancibia Clavel complained in court.

The former member of "The sharks" group is accused of helping Townley set the bomb that killed General Pratts and his wife.

URUGUAY VISA EXEMPT

THE United States Immigration and Naturalisation Service, INS, extended the pilot program that exempts Uruguayans from obtaining visas to enter United States until next February.

The decision was made public by the US Montevideo Embassy and is part of a program that includes 23 countries.

Next February US authorities will decide if the exemption stands definitively or a new extension is considered.

According to the Montevideo media, Uruguay's two year recession is forcing many young people to migrate mainly to Spain, Italy, the United States and Canada.

SIXTY MILLIONTONS OF SOYBEANS

THIS coming 2001 season, Mercosur will confirm once again its position as one of the world's two main soybean production areas.

Argentina, Brazil and Paraguay are expected to harvest 60 million tons, 36% of the world's 168.5 million tons production. The leading producer is the United States with 75 million tons.

Both area and yields in the three Mercosur countries have consistently risen.

SCUFFLE WITH WILLIAM'S GUARDS

GUARDS looking after the Prince of Wales' eldest son attacked a Chilean television crew that was covering Prince William's ten weeks experience in southern Chile.

According to the Chilean press the incident occurred when a Megavision crew was filming William and his companions walking along the river Coyhaique in the Chilean Patagonia.

On seeing the press, the bodyguards requested the television crew to leave the place and after some scuffles attacked the reporters.

Apparently during the incident one of the Megavision camera lenses was broken.

CHILEAN FISH LANDINGS DROP

CHILEAN fish landings during the first eight months of 2000 dropped 17.9%, from a year ago according to official statistics from the Fisheries Under-Secretary.

Last year's landing was 4,079,135 tons against the current 3,347,397 tons.

The modest landing is attributed to a drop in pelagic catches, mainly anchovy, jack mackerel, common sardine, pilchard and hoki that usually account for over 80% of total catch.

Anchovy led catches with 1,188,780 tons, a 37% drop from January-August '99.

The situation is not forecasted to change since jack

mackerel and hoki quotas are inferior to last year's.

SALMON FARMING IN PATAGONIA

SPANISH company Pescanova will be investing 15 million US dollars in a pink salmon farming project in the Argentine province of Santa Cruz.

The project is scheduled to begin next month according to a joint announcement in Buenos Aires of Argentine Agriculture and Fisheries Secretary Antonio Berhongaray and Pescanova Latinamerica's CEO Victor Tarigo.

Pink salmon, (oncorhynchus gorbuscha) will be grown in Lake Buenos Aires while the actual farming of mature specimens will take place in the Puerto Deseado and San Julián estuaries.

The project follows the line of a similar Pescanova farm in Chile with an initial five years production target of 20,000 tonnes.

SPAIN LOOKS FOR NEW FISHING GROUNDS

WITH growing difficulties in operating in northern Africa, the Sahara-Canary Islands and even in the south Pacific, Spanish authorities are now betting on Mexico as a possible fisheries for the Spanish fleet.

Taking advantage of the close links with Mexico and the coming visit to Madrid of elected President Vicente Fox, Spanish officials are proposing talks on the issue in exchange for investments.

An increasing number of Spanish trawlers are idle in Galician ports following the European Union's failure to reach an agreement with Morocco and restrictions in the Saharan-Canary fisheries.

Furthermore countries belonging to the South Pacific Permanent Committee, — Chile, Peru, Ecuador and Colombia — have announced they will establish restrictions beyond the 200 miles zone outside their EEZs, which involves mainly sword fish operations.

Galician fishermen have appealed to Brussels and are preparing to request the United Nations the creation of an multilateral body to regulate fisheries in international waters off the western South American coast.

Chile and Spain have an ongoing conflict regarding sword fish in the Southern Pacific, but Chileans have now managed the support from all the other Pacific neighbouring countries.

DE LA RÚA IN THE

CROSSROAD

A WEEK after president De la Rúa reshuffled the cabinet which was followed by the unexpected resignation of vicepresident Carlos Alvarez, a new political scenario seems to be emerging in Argentina.

"There's no crisis; here the President is in command," insisted President Fernando De la Rúa in a national television speech during a media saturation campaign, in an attempt to appease the situation that is having an impact in local and foreign markets.

The same message was transmitted to American and Brazilian envoys, but events are still evolving.

The ruling alliance partners, Radicales and social-democrats Frepaso, since taking office last December have had trouble agreeing on how to achieve a recessive economy with unemployment on the increase once again, but managed to kept those differences internally until the Senate bribes scandal erupted.

From the beginning Alvarez called for a strong reaction against all those involved in corruption allegations, both in the Legislative and Executive branch. President De la Rúa was inclined to give the Judicial more time to work things out and not rock the boat too strongly fearing institutional complications.

President De la Rúa described Alvarez's resignation as "my worst personal day in this government," adding, "I will miss him."

De la Rúa has since invited Alvarez to manage the Alianza as a political party in the field, ready for next year's senatorial elections, while the former vice president has predicted he will not disrupt the ruling coalition but demands an immediate end to corruption, as "we promised the electorate."

However, with Mr. Alvarez out of government it is expected that Argentina will now be able to further advance economic reforms that have the backing from the business community, international financial institutions and the more conservative and liberal political groups, such as former president Menem and his Peronist following.

The stage is now set for two major political events: one immediate, when Congress considers Mr. Alvarez's resignation and who will replace him. A more distant event, the 2001 higher chamber elections that for the first time in history will elect Senators directly and not through an Electoral College or



The Australian Eastern Market Indicator lost twelve cents on Tuesday and two more cents on Wednesday before partially recovering six on Thursday. The EMI thus closed the week down eight cents at 720 A cents per kg. "The softness in the market being attributed by some experts to the size of the offering, the weak euro and the fact that the Chinese were on holiday." WRWMR In South Africa the BKB Market Indicator also lost ground by dropping

As cents (1.4 per cent) to close at 2449 SA cents/kg clean. In New Zealand, the Fine Indicator lost two cents to 1734 NZ cents, the Medium Indicator gained 5 cents to 591 NZ cents and the Strong Indicator recovered two cents to 445 NZ cents.

Currencies

At London's close for the week the Australian dollar stood a cent stronger at 2.70 AS/£ whilst the New Zealand dollar was two cents stronger at 3.59 NZS/£, compared to last Friday. These levels are however very weak compared to only five weeks ago when the Australian dollar was at 2.52 AS/£ and the New Zealand dollar at 3.40 NZS/£. The consequence is that wool traders buying in sterling can buy wool more cheaply for any given Australian or New Zealand dollar price.

Short Term Outlook

The most testing time for wool prices is approaching with offerings in the Southern Hemisphere at a seasonal peak. FT

Recipes for the Falklands



German Applecake by Elizabeth Villalon

GERMAN sweets always put me in mind of cinnamon and whipped cream.

I remember staying in Germany as a teenager and going out every day to the cultural things adults thought were good for you. Tea time always seemed to include lots of cream. We often went to the back of a cake shop for hot chocolate, served "mit schlag sahne" (thick, whipped cream). Amazing how important phrases come back after all those years. Or if we had a domesticated day, we went down the road and purchased it from the corner cafe by the bowlful, fortuitously taken with us.

I've had this recipe for years and made it with dried and fresh apples with equal success. Of course, it must be served with plenty of whipped cream.

Ingredients

For cake 4 oz margarine 4 oz caster sugar 8oz self-raising flour

pinch of salt

I large, beaten egg.

For filling:

12 oz cooking apples, peeled 2 oz sultanas I oz chopped walnuts half tsp cinnamon

2 oz Demerara sugar

<u>Method</u>

Melt the margarine over a low heat.

Remove and mix the sugar, egg. flour and salt.

Grease and line a 7" tin with removable base.

Spread 2/3 of the mixture over the base of the tin and sides.

Chop the apples into cubes. Mix with sultanas, walnuts and cin-

Scatter over the base. Sprinkle with sugar.

Dot the rest of the cake mixture over the filling.

Bake at 350 degrees F. 180 degrees C. Gas 4 for 60 minutes. Leave to cool in the time

Conservation and Fisheries join forces for penguin research

FALKLANDS Conservation will be carrying out a joint research project with the Fisheries Department starting this month.

Beginning October 18, Andrea Clausen and Nic Huin will undertake work on Saunders Island and then move around West Falkland. diet sampling penguins at various sites adjacent to waters being trawled by MV Dorada.

A spokesman for Falklands Conservation said, "The aim of the work is to investigate the diet of returning rockhopper and Magellanic penguins as well as Gentoo penguins that remain ashore all year round, and to see whether the penguins are utilising the large mature Loligo gahi (a type of squid) that are coming inshore to spawn.

"This is the first such joint project between Falklands Conser-

vation and the Fisheries Department and we hope that our findings will help further solve the mystery around the arrival of some of the top predators that breed in the Falkland Islands and the life cycle of one of our most valuable resources - Loligo gahi.

Stamp booklets: convenience or confusion?

BOOKLETS of stamps were introduced as a helpful way to purchase a number of postage stamps for immediate use, all conveniently housed in a small cardboard folder.

The modern trend began with the 1977 Silver Jubilee issue with blocks of four stamps for each denomination and over 50,000 were

This was such an unusual event that collectors turned the booklets into first day of issue covers, which were franked with special cancellations.

There appears to have been an carlier issue of a booklet in the 1940's at a cost of 2 shillings and 4 pennies, containing 8 x 1d stamps and 8 x 21/2d stamps. It is not known if any complete booklets still exist as it is known only by a photocopy of the cover.

A series of booklets were issued for the 1978 Mail Ships definitive. At a cost of £1, the booklet contained a block of 4 stamps for the 1p, 3p, 5p, 6p and 10p stamps, all the right combinations for both local and airmail postage. So successful were the sales that a further 3 booklets were introduced in the following years.

The stamps remained the same but the colour and ships depicted on the front and back covers changed, providing the collector with four to collect, instead of just

Confusion surrounds the 1983 150th Anniversary of British Administration booklet which was produced privately and not by the

Post Office. Possibly a rare item, it does not feature in the official catalogue but does have a place in any collection, if indeed examples still exist.

The Insects and Spiders series are Numbered 1, 11 and 111 and contain and separate range of stamps in each booklet. Identified by the stamp illustrated on the front cover, they were more trouble to use for easy postage, than the more obvious way of purchasing stamps

It was a way of selling stamps, but convenience had been replaced by commercialism. An extra refinement was the introduction of the left handed booklet, achieved by putting the staple on the right hand side rather than the more usual

Convenience returned with the 1990 Cape Horn booklets. One for 'Local Rate' and one for 'Airmail Rate.' Series one contained five stamps of 3p and 9p and Series eleven contained five each of 6p and 25p. Two stamps were required to cover all possible situations for postage rates.

Total confusion returns with the 1998 Rare Visiting Birds Issue. The £1.54 booklet contains 2 x 9p stamps, 8 x 17p stamps (mainly for local use); plus two extra labels to make up the blocks of four. The £2.10 booklet contains 6 x 35p stamps (Postcard Rate.)

The final irony is that you now have to buy the booklets to obtain the full set of definitive mint

Raleigh International Expedition

WITH his arrival in Southern Chile this week, 18-year-old Prince William, elder son of Prince Charles, faces a rough and challenging ten weeks in one of the world's remotest regions in company with 110 other young men and women from all over the world working on environmental, community and adventure projects organised by Raleigh International

Going on the Chilean expedition was his own idea. "I was just talking with friends and they said it was good idea and I just sort of liked the idea," he said. "I wanted to do something constructive in my gap year (before going to university in Scotland). I thought it was a way of trying to help people out and meeting a whole range of people from other countries and at the same time helping people in remote areas of Chile.

It is one of the varied experiences he will undergo in his long preparation to be a future ruling Monarch of the United Kingdom. It is an imaginative choice. Raleigh International runs similar projects in other parts of the world, including Africa and Mongolia, as well as two other Latin American countries, Costa Rica and Belize, where Prince William also spent some time recently on jungle training with the Welsh Guards

Why choose Chile? It is here that Raleigh International has its longest running programme in any host country. It has taken more than three-thousand young people on its Chilean expeditions since 1985, establishing its headquarters since 1988 in the small capital of Region Eleven, Coyhaique, with fewer than 40,000 inhabitants.

After the two-day bus journey from Santiago to Coyhaique, the expedition takes Prince William and his fellow adventurers into some of the remotest and most beautiful areas of Chilean Patagonia. After medical and survival skills briefings, he will go out into the wilds with fifteen companions, carry out research on rare deer for conservation scientists, take part in community projects improving homes and roads, and carry out map-making.

The Prince will have the opportunity to go trekking in the snowcapped Andes mountains, paddle canoes in Chile's deep lakes and fjords, explore uninhabited islands, and learn wilderness skills.

The young adventurers will be under the surveillance of forty experienced supervisors of various nationalities, skilled in mountaineering and canoeing. Prince William and his companions will be digging their own latrines, existing on army type rations, and experiencing bad weather even in the Austral summer. They will keep in touch with civilisation with army-type radios, and Prince William will be able to pick up letters and exchange e-mails with his father.

The expedition is pleasing to

Prince Charles as Raleigh International grew out of an original idea of his, jointly with a famous British explorer. Colonel John Blashford-Snell, in 1978, called Operation Drake.

Since then Raleigh International has taken 21.500 people from 80 different countries on expeditions, some of them so-called "at risk." socially deprived young people.

Each participant has to find fees of £3,500 (about five and a half thousand dollars). Prince William raised £5.500 (more than eightthousand dollars) with a sponsored polo match. With matching donations from his father, he has given the extra money to fund a disadvantaged inner-city teenager to join a future Raleigh International ex-

Raleigh International describes its purpose as "to inspire people from all backgrounds and nationalities to discover their full potential by working together on challenging environmental and community projects around the world"

It has well-established links with the Chilean authorities, in-cluding CONAF, Corporacion Nacional Forestal, which manages Chile's forestry resources and national parks.

It is also involved in large-scale scientific initiatives, along with scientists from British and Chilean universities, the London and Santiago National History Museums. the Cambridge World Conservation Monitoring Centre and other institutions

Initial work in Laguna San Rafael National Park has expanded to other protected regions, with grants from the European Union, the British Council, commercial sponsors and the Darwin Initiative for the Survival of Species. Raleigh International is at present engaged in a three-year study of the ecology of the endangered huemul deer in partnership with CONAF.

Though Raleigh International is strictly non-political, Prince William's choice of Chile as his destination for an expedition, is helpful to the British Government as it rebuilds relations damaged by the prolonged detention of former Chilean President, General Pinochet, in the United Kingdom, on torture allegations, before his release earlier this year.

Prince Charles and Prince William's mother, the late Princess Diana, have had experience of Latin America, as have his uncle the Duke of York, who fought as a pilot in the 1982 Falklands Conflict, and the Duchess of York. All have visited Argentina where the Duchess of York's late mother also lived, with her Argentine husband. Last year Prince Charles also visited the Falkland Islands and said he would like to take both his sons there on a future trip.

lands Councillors who kindly sanctioned the cash allocation, so giving a tremendous boost to Falklands participation in the International sporting arena.

St Helena, which took part in the first Games in '85 but were unable to attend subsequent Games, re-appeared following a cash injection from the Jersey organising committee.

The 1999 NatWest Island Games, as they are now officially known following a sponsorship agreement between the NatWest Bank and the IGA, were held on Gotland, a large Swedish Island in the Baltic. Visby, the historic capital, is a charming ancient town surrounded by a huge stone wall which was built to keep invading Danes out centuries ago. Small cobbled stone streets with cosy cafes and restaurants ensure that traffic is kept to a minimum.

The number of competitors had by 1999 risen to nearly 2,000 with several hundred officials adding to the total. while the number of Islands had increased to 22 with the acceptance of the Cayman Islands and Rhodes (Greece) into the IGA, and both Islands claimed a series of medals in various sports.

The Falklands team were again indebted to FIG who provided considerable financial assistance while the Falkland Islands Company, as they have since 1993, kindly continued to sponsor the official tracksuits worn by all competitors.

The Falklands shooters again excelled and Police Sergeant Graham Didlick wrote his name into the sporting history books by being the first Islander to win a gold medal at an Island/Common-

wealth Games after a record breaking shoot in the Black Powder muzzle loading rifle event.

With newcomer Ped's score, the combined total ensured a silver medal for the Falklands in the pairs discipline, while the Didlick/Ped pairing also took home a silver in the Black Powder bridge loading rifle event. Individually Graham added another 2 bronze medals to his total, in the Police Pistol 1 and NPA Service B categories.

In the Full-Bore shooting Kenny Aldridge and Timmy McCallum held off a spirited challenge from the St. Helenian team to win a bronze medal in the 300m team event, completing a very successful Games for the Falklands.

In the swimming pool the 8 young swimmers all achieved p.b.'s in their events, providing valuable experience for future Games, while the athletes put up some good times, and the golfers posted better scores than in previous Games.

Now the NatWest Island Games attract international recognition with a multitude of TV/Radio/Newspaperreporters attending the week long sporting occasion. There are however fears within the IGA that the Games will become 'too big' and ways of maintaining the present competitor levels are being discussed.

There is a possibility that no new Islands will be accepted, unless a present Member drops out.

Meanwhile preparations are underway in the Falklands to ensure participation in the 2001 Island Games on the Isle of Man.

Next week - a look ahead in detail to the 2001 Games.

Non-recognition of Islanders is "blunder" Di Tella criticises Argentine government

"A RIDICULOUS blunder" is how ex Foreign Minister of Argentina. Guido Di Tella, describes the current Argentine government's policy of refusing to acknowledge the exist-ence of Falkland Islanders as a peo-

ple with rights.
Dr. Di Tella made the comment in an interview with Pengum News on Thursday, five days after his arrival in the Falklands. He also condemned the Argentine ruling party's objection to the Governor of the Falkland Islands meeting him at the airport and inviting him to dinner at government house

Dr Di Tella said this protest was "a shocker", adding "Normally you protest when your citizens are not well treated, not when they are well treated... it puts us in a very bad

"I have said you are part of the problem." said Dr Di Tella. "therefore you must be part of the solution to the problem... We cannot talk only to the British that is ridiculous. Ignoring you is stopping relations altogether .. you are an increasingly cen-

tral part of the problem.

Dr Di Tella became well known during his ten years as Argentine Foreign Minister, as the architect of the "charm offensive" towards Falkland Islanders. On Thursday he said he hoped in the future to convince other Foreign Ministers that his policies were the right ones. He commented, "Firstly you must recognise the identity of your partner and secondly treat them with great respect. If you can transmit this then you can talk and if you can talk then you can have a solution.

He added. "For over ten years I have been trying to develop humane relations between your side and ours. Unless we develop this minimum trust we will never develop an answer to our problems. It makes me very unhappy, this situation where it is believed that whatever is good for us is bad for you. That is not the

Speaking of his charm offensive Dr Di Tella said, "The gifts (to Islanders) indicated that I wanted to recognise your existence," adding. "We must understand each other - I consider myself one of those who understands more than others." He said that having been in contact with Islanders, "I began to like you, I really think that you are nice people. You are not the monsters that you are described in some quarters in Argentina.
"Now I am in the middle of a row

with the Foreign Minister because he objects to my accepting of the dinner given to me yesterday and the fact that the Governor received me. Two things that I appreciate very much and I believe send the right messages to everybody: Islanders and Argies as well

Responding to some Islanders' opinion that only the Argentines have a problem, Dr Di Tella said, "That is similar to the idea of us thinking you do not exist. We are a problem, so you have a problem because we have a problem. Let us be realistic. We do exist as well.

On the subject of a solution involving compromise he said, "It would have to be a solution that makes you happy - not completely happy but one that is acceptable, honourable. The same has to apply with my countrymen.

"In some instances some people will get horrified - that is life. We need to find a solution. I think it is a big mistake in the islands to say we don't have a problem, the Argies have a problem, that is not true.

Of the Governor welcoming him to the Islands Dr Di Tella said, "I did not expect that I would be received at such a high level." He said this move ...was good for us and you - it was very brave of him (the Governor) and he is paying a political price but that is our job. I feel very encouraged. I have devoted ten years of my life in a very significant way and I hate to see that you are unhappy that we exist, it is unnatural."

On his influence over Argentine opinion Dr Di Tella commented "I think that this trip and what I am

going to say in the future will contribute in that direction (recognition of Islanders). I think that by the present (Argentine) Minister attacking me so bluntly in a way he has made this visit much more important from an Argentine point of view."

Dr Di Tella believes of his charm offensive, "...the only people who can judge whether that was successful or not is yourselves ...

Meeting with councillors

Councillors Birmingham, Cheek, Clifton, Halford and Summers "...met informally with Dr Guido Di Tella and his son. Luciano, over a cup of tea at Gilbert House on Wednesday. it was announced this week.

According to a press release, "Councillors were able to gain valuable insights into the current political situation in Argentina as well as hearing the former Argentine Foreign Minister's impressions of his holiday so far."

Asked why councillors enter-tained Dr Di Tella when they had formerly announced their intention to treat him as "any other tourist" Councillor Cheek told Penguin News, "We meet everyone in our offices, whether tourist or journalist."

She said they preferred not to meet him at the Malvina House Hotel where it might have become an "Argentine press jamboree.'

Positive changes planned for Seafish

SEAFISH (Falklands) Ltd is undergoing change. It is involved in the formation of a new company.

Shareholders will be issued with seven fully paid shares for every single share currently held which. according to Seafish manager Hamish Wylie, "...effectively transfers retained profit in the company to shareholders, thereby increasing the share capital held in the company. In a letter to Seafish shareholders, Chairman Rodney Lee reports another advance in the company: "A major development for Seafish has been the formation of a new company, Nova Seafish Ltd. Nova Seafish represents a joint venture be-

tween Seafish (35%), Pescanova SA (50%) and Seaview Ltd (15%). The company has been formed to enable the purchase of the trawler FV Saint Denis, with a view to successful application for a Loligo licence in the coming season, 2001. It is proposed to rename the vessel the Robin M Lee in memory of the debt of gratitude the company owes tachievements on its behalf.

Mr Lee continues, positively commenting, "As a publicly owned company, Pescanova provides an ideal partner for Seafish, sharing a similar style of corporate structure and long-term commitment to the Falklands Fishery. Seaview brings to the company its experience in the management and operation of the vessel, which will be essential to successful operation under its new ownership.

DESPITE the fact that news and speculation in the Islands sometimes seem to circulate with greater speed than sound and technology would actually allow, on my return to the office after five days out in the Camp I truly felt I had been living in a world (in terms of information) ever so slightly removed from that which I normally inhabit.

Not that it wasn't an educational experience, because I was able to confidently conclude that the stories which fly with breakneck speed up mountain and down dale via telephone, email and fax, occasionally pay so little resemblance to those deemed publishable by a newspaper, they might just as accurately have been communicated by smoke signal.

I don't suppose that comes as a great surprise to anyone, but still it was a bit of a shock to discover that most of the armful of "potential stories" I carried back to work from the wilds of the North Camp had already been discovered, digested, researched and summarily dismissed by the Deputy Editor.

Clearly the lack of those little reminders of journalistic responsibility - tape recorders and reliable sources etc. - had left me as vulnerable as anyone to RITS. (Reckon It's True Syndrome).

PERHAPS less of a surprise, but as perplexing as ever, was the little pile of complaints awaiting me from members of the public.

At least four or five residents demanded to know why I had taken it upon myself to include in the paper not only a letter from the ex President of Argentina (albeit a rather puzzling one) but "...all that news about b*****y Di Tella."

When I enquired of a number of the complainants why they objected to the articles they indicated that I should have "just ignored" the offending individuals.

Even my rather tentative suggestion that a newspaper really should report on the biggest news stories of the year so far was dismissed with equal contempt.

Accused of doing my job? Things could be worse I suppose.

Boca Juniors associated team: Imminent signing for Martyn

ISLANDER Martyn Clarke, who began training with Argentine Football Club Boca Juniors just over a year ago, has returned to the Islands in search of sponsorship so that he might continue his career.

Martyn is on the brink of signing with Boca Juniors Associated Club. El Porvenir, but initially must wade through a mountain of Argentine bureaucracy before he can begin to play. In terms of the complexities surrounding his signing. Martyn said. "I'm not certain what the problem is, I haven't had much help with the paper work.." He has been assured, however, that he will receive a contract for at least one year.

It appears that the fact that Martyn was born in Britain as opposed to the Falklands is a stumbling block.

He was also offered a place with premiership team Velezsarsfield, but has decided to play for El Porvenir.

A Buenos Aires newspaper recently reported that Martyn was applying for an Argentine residents permit, a story which lead to the Falklands government writing to him to ask if it was true. Martyn told *Pengum News*, "...that is simply not true... *La Nacion* wrote it because they thought it was the reason I came back here."

Martyn confirmed that he would be receiving a minimum wage when he begins to play professionally, but "...it's not very much and I really need sponsorship... that's why I've come back." He needs around £400 a month and is hoping that an Argentine or Falk-land Islands company will agree to sponsorship. "My Mum's already

approached some local companies but we haven't achieved anything yet."

The twenty year old who has always made it clear that he has no interest in politics "only football", confirmed that he has improved enormously over the last year, but has had to work harder than the Argentine youths. "....they start a lot younger over there."

He feels he is as good as the other players in terms of speed, fitness and goal scoring, but as a result of starting late "I lack some of the movement that the others have."

Asked what he will do if no sponsorship turns up he commented. "I'm fairly confident that something will come up, but anyway I'm going to try and earn as much money as I can while I'm here, maybe get involved in some fund-raising." He will be returning to Argentina in January.

"Every bit as committed" assures Minister

SHADOW Defence Minister Quentin Davies assured Islanders this week that the Conservative Party was, "...every bit as committed as we were when we were in power before to the Falklandsright to self determination."

He added, "And I don't want anyone in Argentina to have any doubts about that."

During his week long visit to the Islands Mr Davies spoke positively about the impression the Falklands had made on him.

He said, "This is a very viable community which more than justifies all the efforts we have made over the years to make sure that your future is secure and your independence is safeguarded and I am extremely encouraged about the future so long as of course we do not let down our guard (towards Argentina).

The primary reason for Mr Davies visit to the Islands was to visit Mount Pleasant complex and look at. "... morale and the mission and any problems that might arise in those connections."

He said however that he also, "_wanted to meet the government and form a view about things in this part of the world."

On the coinciding visit to the islands of ex Foreign Minister of Argentina. Guido di Tella, Mr Davies said. "I will be very happy to talk to him and say to him that there is absolutely no question of any future Conservative government (and I trust no government

in Great Britain) undertaking negotiations about sovereignty and anything of that sort - it's quite absurd."

He hoped that Argentina would, "...eventually feel there is no mileage for them in continuing this barren confrontation."

On what he described as the minimum military capability in the Falklands he said. "...it should not be reduced under any circumstances."

Asked that if the Conservative Party came to power, would they approve assistance by the Royal Navy to the FIG anti poaching effort he said. "We would look at a request for assistance to the anti poaching effort with some sympathy...it is part of the obligation of the Royal Navy to protect British territories."

However he pointed out that although the benefits of the fishery "quite rightly" comes to the Falkland Islands "...equally if we had to commit Royal Naval forces, there might be legitimate discussion about the proper division of the cost."

Talking of the future of the military airlink he commented," As long as the Argentine claim to the Falklands is sustained we do not want to depend on South America as a staging post for communications to London.

He noted that the Tristar was an "essential lifeline" for the military and civilians in the Islands and important for the Falklands gov-

ernment from an economic point of view. He said should the Conservatives come to power, the situation could be discussed and a way forward sought, as well as "...what is a fair distribution of the cost."

Mr Davies commented that he had been enormously struck, not only by the peace and beauty of the Islands but, "...by how thriving a community this is.

"It is not just a few small islands with a few people trying to scratch a living out of sheep farming which I think too often is the impression elsewhere.

"It is a thriving and sophisticated community with highly skilled people doing jobs that are taking to the frontiers that activity." (Fish protection and oil)

Mr Davies met with councillors formally on Tuesday evening.

WHO owns the water and fish in Falklands' rivers?

Attorney General, David Lang, told *Penguin News*, "Neither the fish nor the water are owned by anybody.

"The riverbed and the right to fish are owned by the Crown where the river is tidal. The Crown allows the public to fish in those parts of rivers where it owns fishing rights, subject to any applicable conservation laws.

"Where the river is no longer tidal, the riverbed is owned by the landowners on each side up to the median line, and those landowners own the fishing rights over their side of the riverbed unless they have sold those rights to somebody else.

ARE Cable and Wireless using a DSU 640 Anti-callback system or something similar?

Cable and Wireless General Manager, Steve Baker provided the following answer. "As the person raising the question has chosen to remain anonymous we are unable to clarify the precise meaning of the question.

"We have therefore interpreted it as meaning – are Cable & Wireless employing a piece of equipment to block call back services. The answer to this is No. This must be about the third time we have publicly made this statement in *Penguin News*."

Looking ahead to the Island Games of 2001

AS OUTLINED in the last report. the Island Games began as the 'Inter-Island Games' in 1985 on the Isle of Man (IOM)

They were expected to be a oneoff event but so successful were they that team managers decided to meet again 2 years later on the Island of Guernsey where the Island Games Association (IGA) was formed, an Executive Committee elected and the Island Games named and permanently established

The IGA Constitution provides the framework under which each Island Association operates. Islands representatives at the Guernsey meeting in '87 agreed that competitors and officials should be responsible for their own transport and accommodation costs.

Next year the NatWest Island Games (as they are now known) return to their 'home' and will be staged between July 7 and 13, 2001 on the Isle of Man. While the first Games in 1985 cost £70,000 to stage, the forthcoming sporting festival will require £650,000 to organize. Already £200,000 has been raised through sponsorship while the IOM Government have guaranteed the remaining £450,000.

The 1985 Games were held in relative secrecy as there was little media attention focused on the 600 competitors from 15 Islands who

participated in just 7 sports. But already one television company has indicated their intention to devote one channel solely to the 2001 Island Games while media attention in general is building up some 8 months in advance of the opening

Bearing in mind that next year's Games will attract 22 Islands who will bring in excess of 3,000 competitors and officials, who will participate in fourteen sports, the IOM Government last year appointed a Games Administrator to supervise the organizing of the week long sporting festival.

A new Athletics stadium, capable of holding 10,000 spectators and boasting an 8 lane running track has been built, while a 'state of the art' swimming pool, with a retractable bottom, has already been tried and tested. A new shooting complex at the old Slieam Lhost Quarry site. 1.500 feet up a mountain, has been established at a cost of £50,000 while Badminton will be played at two locations along the main Promenade in Douglas, the IOM capital.

Golfers will head for Mt Murray and Castletown where there are two excellent courses. while football will be played at various fields with the final at the National Sporting Centre.

The IOM attracts thousands of tourists every summer and the many hotels will be reserved for competitors/officials during the Games week, who will pay on-going rates.

The Falklands sent its first team to an Island Games in 1993 and the aim of the FIOGA is to ensure that the Islands will be represented at the so-called 'Friendly' Games on the IOM next year.

Internationally the Games now attract ever increasing media attention and the 2001 spectacle looks like being the biggest yet. There are likely Falklands participants in Athletics, Badminton, Golf, Shooting. Swimming and, for the first time, Football.

FIOGA, which is the officially recognized administrative sporting organization for Island/Commonwealth Games, will once again be looking for financial assistance to ensure Falklands participation. while individual clubs are also embarking upon their own fund raising efforts. Falklands councillors. continued on page 13

General Practice with Dr Barry Elsby

INFECTIONS affecting the nose, voicebox (larynx) or the main airway (trachea) or the airways going into the lungs (bronchii) are common.

These infections include colds. laryngitis, tracheitis and bronchitis. Doctors often just use the term URTI – upper respiratory tract infection – to include any of all of these. Almost all URTI's are due to virus infections.

What are the symptoms of a URTI?

Cough is usually the main symptom. Other symptoms include fever, headache, hoarseness, aches and pains. Cold symptoms may occur if the infection also affects the nose. Symptoms typically peak after 2-3 days and the gradually clear. However, the cough can persist after the infection has gone. This is because the inflammation in the airways caused by the infection may take a while to clear. It may take up to four weeks after other symptoms have gone for a cough to clear completely.

What is the treatment for an URTI?

Despite cough being very common, there is no 'quick fix' for a cough due to a virus infection. Patience and perseverance are required until the cough goes. Most

viral infections clear without treatment; the body's immune system fights them off.

Take paracetamol or aspirin to reduce fever and ease any aches, pains and headaches. Ibuprofen (Neurofen) is an alternative to Aspirin. Many cold remedies contain Aspirin or Paracetamol, so be careful not to exceed the recommended dose. (Children under 12 should not be given aspirin. Paracetamol liquid is best for children).

• Have lots of drink if there is a fever to prevent mild dehydration.

Cough medicines bought at pharmacies may help a little. They often contain several ingredients. Some cause drowsiness which may help with sleep. Some have decongestants that may help a bunged nose. Some contain paracetamol so be careful that the total amount of paracetamol taken is not above the recommended limit, some contain mild cough suppressants but they have little impact on the cough.

Antibiotics are not usually advised. Antibiotics do not kill viruses – they only kill bacteria. Antibiotics do not usually improve a URTI. They may even make symptoms worse as some people develop side effects with antibiotics such as diarrhoea, feeling sick



and rashes.

What symptoms should I look out for?

Most URTI's clear without complications. Very occasionally the infection can involve the lungs and cause pneumonia. Other causes of cough (such as asthma) sometimes mimic a URTI. Consult a doctor if any of the following occur:

 If symptoms such as fever, chest pains or headaches become worse or severe.

 Breathing difficulties such as wheezing or shortness of breath.

Blood is coughed up.

Drowsiness or confusion.

 Any other symptoms that develop which you are unhappy with or do not understand.

• A cough that persists longer than 3-4 weeks.

HOKI FOR HUMAN CONSUMPTION

AFTER rapidly finishing in a few days the common hake quota, Chilean fishing companies are requestinghoki catches be used for human consumption and not for the fish-meal industry.

Chilean companies Grimar and Friosur are pressing for elimination of 1985 legislation removing southern blue whiting and hoki from the list of species eligible for the fish-meal and fish oil industries.

Alberto Ellena, managing director of Grimar, said that hoki catches in the central southern region of Chile reached 184,000 tonnes, equivalent as fish meal to 12.9 million US dollars. Mr. Ellena argues that this volume of hoki if used for human consumption, would have generated 102.9 million US dollars and created 7,800 jobs giving an overall thrust to the industry.

Fish industry sources indicated that if the request is not considered by Fisheries Department officials, "we will start legal action, since the spirit of the Chilean legislation is the efficient exploitation of resources."

However scientists warn that hoki for human consumption demands additional conservation care given its biological conditions and this will represent an increase in catching and transport costs.

CHILEAN FISH MEAL EXPORTS PLUMMET

CHILE'S fish meal exports during the first eight months of 2000 reached 163 million US dollars, a 21% drop compared to the same period a year ago, according to a report from the National Fishing Association.

The industry blames the poor showing to lower catches of sardine and anchovy in the central-southern region plus the ban on jack mackerel, imposed to protect the resource. Compared to a similar period in the 1997 season, when exports reached 387 million US dollars, the drop is a record 58%.

Overall it has been a poor year for Chilean fisheries since overall catches in the January-September period totaled 3.57 million tons, a 15% drop from the same period in 1999 which was not a good year either.

Fish meal prices are not encouraging: so far the average price dropped 8.6%, which 25% below the '97 average and 37% below '98 that was a good year. In 1998 a tonne of fish meal fetched 700 US dollars, in May

'99.426 US dollars and last August 418 US dollars. Sardine, anchovy and jack mackerelare the backbone of the Chilean fish meal industry, second only worldwide to Peru. (FIS/MP)

NEWZEALANDERSAFTER HOKI

A MODERN factory freezer trawler owned by the Norwegian company VolstadShippingAS is to join the Sealord fleet in February 2001.

This 68-metreship is on contract from the Norwegian company and will be used to catch and process hoki.

SirTipeneO'Reagan, chairman of Sealord, regards this vessel as an important addition: "We gain another vessel with catching and processing facilities similar to those of our existing state of the art trawlers Rehua, Aoraki and Aorere and we have formed a strategic relationship with a Norwegian company with extensive fishing experienceand abilities."

The new vessel will be renamed when it arrives in New Zealand and will be completely refitted to give the company the flexibility to process value-addedhoki products.

Sealord is at present expanding its quotabase beyond New Zealand and is looking for powerful flexible shipsable to catch and process hoki in international waters. They are keen to discover ways to increase the value-added products processed at sea.

Norwegianengineerswilltravel with the ship and train the new Kiwi engineers. They will also help with the new factory and engine up grades.

ARGENTINA AND URUGUAY REINFORCE SECURITY

SECURITY forces in Argentina and Uruguay are in a state of alert following developments in the Middle East.

Synagogues, mesquites, Jewish and Arab schools and associations as well embassies and other interests have reinforced security, and controls in customs and borders have become more strict.

Argentina is particularly fearful following the 1992 and 1994 bomb attacks against the Israeli Embassy and a Jewish Association in Buenos Aires that left 115 dead and hundreds wounded.

Both countries are also in the area of influence of Ciudad del Este in Paraguay with a numerous Arab and Palestinian population which

is believed, according to American and European intelligence, to have terrorist links. Residente in the city have declared several days of mourning, following killings in the Palestinian-Israeliconfrontations.

The city is also known for the smuggling of weapons, explosives and providing false documents.

Argentine Intelligence Chief Fernando de Santibañes cancelled a trip to the CIA in Washington to organise the security clamp.

"GERITOL" EFFECT

NEW ZEALAND scientists have been researching and testing sea weeds that have the capacity to absorb carbon dioxide if supplemented with iron compounds.

"Geritol" as the process is known was tested in the southern Pacific, and later in areas between Tasmania and Antarctica. It consisted of spreading an iron compound in vast areas that later proved not only to have tripled sea weed population but also that they had incorporated between 600 and 3,00s tonnes of carbon dioxide, the main element in the greenhouse effect that threatens the world.

The process was previously successfully experimented in tropical Pacific, "but we still have scientific questions to answer before we propose iron fertilisation as a tactic to help with climatic control," said Dr. Kenneth Coale, from the New Zealand Atmospheric Research Institute.

The main question is whether the carbon dioxide absorbed is then deposited in the sea bed and becomes part of the biological chain, or if it's returned to the atmosphere, or what happens with methane gas.

BRITISH SECRETARY IN ARGENTINA

A FIRST line British envoy with a supportand confidencemessage to the Argentine government and current course of line is expected in Buenos Aires.

According to Argentine diplomatic sources British Trade and Industry Secretary Stephen Byers will be meeting with

President De la Rúa, Economy Minister José Machinea, Foreign Affairs Minister Adalberto Rodríguez Giavarini and other high ranking officials but above all will bring a reassuring message to British investors in Argentina.

Although the visit was scheduled well before the current political situation, the fact that Mr. Byers is one of Tony Blair's closest Ministers (Top five), will make his presence in Argentina particularly supportive of President De la Rúa's administration and economic recovery program.

"The message to British investors will be that the Labour government trusts the Argentine recovery and investments must continue," said Argentine sources according to the Buenos Aires press.

Mr. Byers visit follows that of US President Clinton special envoy. Arturo Valenzuela, and Spanish government vicepresident Mariano Rajoy, both of whom expressed their governments support to President De la Rúa.

United States and Spain are the country's main foreign investors but Britainholds a vital chair in the International Monetary Fund Board and normally supports Argentina.

NATURAL GAS IN PERU

ITALIAN-ARGENTINE company Techint leads a holding that will make the only presentation for the transport and distribution tender of Camisea, the natural gas field in Peru considered the greatest in Latinamerica, that opens this Friday.

The licencing has been cancelled on two previous occasions, leaving Dutch Shell out of the lucrative concession.

The oil industry has also been rocked by the announcement that US giant oil companies Chevron and Texaco, have resumed talks for a possible merger. If discussions are successful the new group will have over 85 billion US dollars in assets. Both companies have interests in Argentina and Brazil.

RESCUE PACKAGE FOR AEROLÍNEAS

AEROLÍNEAS ARGENTINAS. Argentina's flag carrier privatised in 1991, will undergo a restructuring plan, including 682 million US dollars in fresh money, in a last minute attempt to save the company from bankruptcy and closure.

The company whose majority share package now belongs to a Spanish government company, currently has accumulated debts of \$50 million US dollars and is loosing between 25 and 30 million US dollars per month.

After months of negotiations the Spaniards finally agreed to inject 650 million US dollars and the Argentine government, (which still holds a 5% stake) 32 million US dollars.

However further discussions are expected to decide on how the promised new money will be invested and ways to cut the payroll through a "voluntary" retirement system (1,200 out of a total 6,000 jobs, plus salary reductions).

To improve the company's revenue, the program includes new routes, an increase in the number of flights and partial renewal of the fleet by concentrating in Airbus 340 and Boeings.

Starting in March. Aerolineas will fly directly to Paris and Milan with an only stop in Madrid. As of next week there will be an extra daily flight to Madrid and another to Miami with a stop in Punta Cana. in the Caribbean.

Regional flights to Sao Paulo. Brazil and Santiago will also be increased and beginning January transpolar crossings to New Zealand will include a weekly stopover in Ushuaia to attract Australian and New Zealand tourists.

Limiting the fleet to Airbus and Boeing, should reduce maintenance and repair costs.

Another proposal is to agree a "consensus" flights and frequency policy with other companies in the Argentine market. to avoid saturation and increase the occupancy coefficient of aircraft.

SUMMER TIME IN CHILE

AS of Saturday, October 14, Chile is under summer time.

Clocks were advanced sixty minutes and will remain so until the first Saturday of next March when they will be set back an hour.

The decision will help save energy and take advantage of the longer daylight hours.

DROP IN FRESH FISH LANDINGS

ACCORDING to official statistics from the Spanish Fisheries Office, fresh fish landings in Spain have dropped considerablyso far this year.

Particularly serious has been the forced docking of the Canary Islands fishing fleet which has meant that

1.a 1.uz harbour has seen a dismal landing of 3.612 tons compared to the 45.190 tons of the same period last. A fall in catches was also recorded in other Spanish ports, such as Almeria (34.79%, with 3.048 tonnes), Algeciras (30.52% and 6.339 tonnes) and Barcelona (21.14% and 3.690 tonnes).

Meanwhile landings of fresh fish increased by 19.93% from 9.106 tonnes to 10.921 tonnes in Castellón.

In the first eight months of this year fresh fish landings in Spanish ports reached 183,961 tonnes, a 25 % drop compared to the 245,729 tonnes of the same period last year. Vigo figures top of the list with 45,796 tonnes, followed by La Coruña, 31,726 tonnes and Cadiz, 18,853 tonnes.

SPANISH-BRITISHFISHERIES COMMITTEE

THOUGH Newfoundland, Gran Sol. the Gulf of Viscay. Morocco and the Falkland Islands constitute important fishing grounds for Galician vessels, since quotas are rapidly being used up fleet owners fear this could lead to a forced stop of activities, reports the newspaper from La Coruña, La Voz de Galicia.

Galician ship owners and crewmen are aware of the delays hindering the conclusion of some fishing agreements, and although they recognise the efforts made by political representatives to find solutions to the numerous and serious problems affecting the deep-sea fishery, they do not want to remain idle.

The newspaper points out that the difficult situation of the cephalopod fleet that operated in Morocco is one of the most noticeable problems. Also, the completion of the Spanish hake quota in Gran Sol, announced recently by the Government is of great concern to the Galicia fishing industry.

With this in mind, says La Voz de Galicia. parties involved are taking the first steps to create a Spanish-British association and are planning a meeting on 25 October at the Mid Atlantic Fisheries headquarters in London.

It is expected that the meeting will result in a Spanish-British Fisheries Committee. with representatives from both governments and from fishing associations. Its main goal strengthen participation in the decision-taking process concerning EU fishing policy. Ship owners and representatives of the Galician fishing sector hope this first step will be followed by a similar one resulting in the creation of a similar association with Irish interests.

The current situation for the Galician industry with limited fishing grounds and quotas is considered similar to that experienced some

years ago in French waters.

Differences between Spain and France on the issue were followed by serious incidents in the disputed areas between both fleets, ships ramming each other and cutting nets. The press named it the "fish war" and it made headlines for several months before a Spanish-French Fisheries Committee was created to help overcome differences.

Both governments and local industry associations played key roles in cooling tempers and finding an acceptable solution. (FIS/MP)

GOOD NEWS FOR SALMON

THE American Heart Association. (AHA) unveiled new dietary guidelines earlier this month that have now been expanded to include specific recommendationstailored to an individual risk of heart disease and stroke. They are great news for the salmon farming industry worldwide.

The guidelines, based on an analysis of hundreds of studies, will be published in the 31 October issue of Circulation: Journal of the American Heart Association.

Ronald M. Krauss, M.D., the principal author of the guidelines and a senior scientist at the University of California said in a press release from the AHA that the four main goals of the new guidelines are to help Americans achieve an overall healthy eating pattern; achieve and maintain an appropriate body weight; achieve and maintain a desirable cholesterol profile, and achieve and maintain a desirable blood pressure level.

A diet rich in fish, fruits, vegetables, legumes (beans), whole grains, low-fat dairy products, lean meats and poultry is still the basis of the recommendations. The association continues to recommend eating five servings of fruits and vegetables and six servings of grains daily. But, for the first time, two weekly servings (3 oz. each) of fatty fish, such as tuna or salmon, are recommended. Canned products of these species count as well.

The association recommends that healthy adults minimize the intake of foods containinghigh levels of saturated fats (found in animal products and tropical oils) and substantially reduce the intake of trans fatty acids (the hydrogenated oil found in commercially prepared foods and some hard margarines). For individuals with risk factors for heart disease or existent heart disease, a further reduction in saturated fat intake is recommended.

For the first time, the guidelines stress the importance of preventing obesity and are easier to use because they stress overall eating patterns, rather than a percentage of dietary fat or other nutrients.

"We are emphasizing the positive message of what people should eat - for example, more plant-based foods," Krauss said. "In the past we have focused rather heavily on the percent of calories as fat and amounts of cholesterol. These are still important considerations, but the emphasis has shifted to allow consumers to understand the importance of an overall eating plan. (FIS/UC)

US "ORGANIC" DEBATE

MEMBERS of a new American task force to look at the possibility of creating organic standards for wild fish and aquaculture have been named and their first findings will be reported to the United States National Organic Standards Board (NOSB). November 15. in Washington, DC.

The plan sponsored by the US Agriculture Department is to have the task force make its final recommendations in time for public review when the NOSB meets in March 2001.

The task force faces a contentious issue. Some traditional participants in the organic industry oppose organic certification of seafood on philosophical grounds. saying wild fish swim in waters that are beyond the producers' control. Meanwhileseafood producers regard organic certification as rightful recognition for sustainably produced, conscientiously handled fish: some view their product as inherently organic.

Kathleen Merrigan, administrator of the Agricultural Marketing Service, the branch of the Agriculture Department that oversees the National Organic Programme, said the task force will look at all the issues after getting more than 70 formal comments from public hearings.

"An analysis of the comments shows little consensus on organic certification of seafood at this time," she said. "Reaching consensus on this complex issue will not be an easy task."

"Historically, the organic industryhas achieved consensus only after lengthy and concerted deliberations by the NOSB and other organic industry groups." she said in a letter to Alaska Sen. Ted Stevens, who sponsored legislation to create organic seafood standards. "Effective standards must be based on consensus among producers and consumers."

Miles McEvoy, organic program manager for Washington State, was named chairman of the wild harvest working group. Also named to this committee were NOSB members Carolyn Brickey, Steven Harper and William Lockertz along with Katherine DiMatteo, executive director of the Organic Trade Association, Paul Peyton of Juneau. AK, David Gould of Portland, John Pappalardo of North Chatham, MA. Chris Dorsett of New Orleans, Jan Konigsberg of Anchorage, AK, Zeke Grader of San Francisco, Jim Riddle of Winona, MN and Jim Humphreys of Seattle.

The formation of the task force was announced by Bob Anderson, past chairman of the NOSB, after the USDA National Organic Programmeconductedthree hearings on the controversial issue.

The National Organic Programme is seeking direction from the NOSB before it moves on creating any regulations on wild caught fish and farm fish. Legislation passed by the American Congresshas directed the USDA to draft organic seafood standards and appropriated 75,000 US dollars for hearings. (FIS/USDA).



Auctions
This week Australia held four days of auctions. The Sydney sale on Monday lifted the Eastern Market Indicator 2 cents. on Tuesday the EMI gained three cents, another five cents were added on Wednesday and finally a cent was lost on Thursday, to close the week up nine cents at 729 A cents per kg. Wednesday's EMI level of 730 is the high point of the season to date in Australian dollar terms.

In South Africa the Cape Wool indicator lost 4.5 percent to end at 2138 SA cents/kg clean. "To remain competitive, local buyers are being forced to adjust prices downward to correct the higher prices they have been paying relative to Australia in the past few weeks." WRWMR New Zealand's wool indices all eased back this week. The Fine Indicator lost 53 cents to 1681 NZ cents, the Medium Indicator lost 8 cents to

lost 53 cents to 1681 NZ cents, the Medium Indicator lost 8 cents to 583 NZ cents whilst the Strong Indicator dropped 6 cents to 439 NZ

Currencies & Interest Rates

For wool markets "Currency is still influential. The Australian dollar despite an apparently healthy economy, continues to be groggy against the United States dollar. The pain is inflicted more by the United States currency's strength than the Australian dollar's weakness. China was again very interested this week in greasy wool and tops. Wool for the Chinese is about 10% cheaper than it was four months ago." WRWMR The Australian dollar closed the week in London at 2.74 AS/£ whilst the New Zealand dollar closed at 3.64 NZS/£; both weaker on the week



Recipes for the Falklands

Onion Tart

QUICHE is to the French, as pizza is to the Italians. In Italy they put leftovers on a bit of bread dough and smother it in cheese. In France it is a pastry base and the additions drown in egg custard.

This is one of the dishes that can be made badly and put you off it for life with cold egg. floppy pastry and pink bits in the middle. However, here in the Falklands we have a chance to elevate this to haute cuisine. We have farm fresh eggs (duck and hen.) farm cream and home-cured bacon. This is a slight variation but the same custard can be used to hide anything else in the name of a decent quiche.

Ingredients

Rich Pastry 80z flour 40z margarine 1 egg

Make the pastry in the usual way and line the quiche dish.

Filling

2 Tbsp butter 4 medium ontons 200mt cream 2 eggs seasoning and nutmeg

Slice the onions thinly and fry till soft in the butter

Mix with the cream, beaten eggs and seasoning

Bake 30-35 minutes in a moderately hot oven

Delicious Potato Cake

ONE of the side effects of writing this column is having to try out

a variety of recipes to keep it full.

However, as I have a wide circle of voluntary consumers for tasting purposes, this isn't usually too much of a problem. On this occasion (read occasions, as several re-tests were required just to make sure) the consensus was that although the ingredients sound unusual, this truly deserves its title. The final result is neither too sweet, nor greasy with a hint of spice which is just that bit different.

To ensure success, make up the mashed potatoes fresh for the occasion. These need to be hot for the cake to rise well.

Ingredients

12oz sugar 4oz margarine

80z hot mash, made from 80z peeled potatoes or packet mash.

6 oz chocolate - melted

4 fl oz milk

12 oz plain flour

2 tsp baking powder

4 eggs

3 tsp mixed spice

4 oz chopped nuts

Method

Cream sugar and margarine.

Add mash, chocolate, milk, flour and baking powder.

Add the eggs. Mix well.

Add spice and nuts.

Grease and line a 10" tin. Bake at 200°C (325°F) for one hour until springy.

Serve with a heavy dusting of icing sugar and chocolate shavings.

New stamp issue: bold or subtle design?

THE release of a new stamp and appropriate First Day Cover provides an opportunity for the country issuing the stamp to take centre stage. This can be used effectively as a propaganda tool to promote the stamp design, the country of origin and, in a subtle way, the sovereignty.

All stamps issued by our Government boldly bear the words 'Falkland Islands' and carry the Queen's Head or the symbol EIIR. In earlier issues this was a full portrait, but the modern trend has been to emphasise the distinctive local design and only proclaim the monarch in silhouette. Therefore any collector is left in no doubt as to the sovereign and the name of the country.

This situation is reversed when a foreign country lays claim to another and issues stamps announcing their 'ownership.' The Argentine issue of February 22, 1964 sets out their claims in Antarctica. South Georgia, South Sandwich. South Orkneys and the Falkland Islands with maps, flags and the renaming of all the territories.

The First Day Cover states the reason for the issue as the 60th Anniversary of the possession of the South Orkneys. In the same year cancelling machines proclaimed 'sovereignty' on all mail irrespective of the postage stamp. A sec-

ond issue of stamps on a similar themeon April 24, 1976 again used a map of the Falklands, plus a painting of the frigate Heroina under the command of David Jewet. First Day Covers continued the theme with flags, ships, maps and propaganda speeches.

The Republica Argentina setenant pair issue for June 12, 1982 portrays a map of part of the South Atlantic Ocean from Tierra del Fuego to the South Sandwich Islands. All are named to proclaim 'sovereignty.' The second stamp has a portrait of Don Luis Vernet 1829 with the words first political and military commandant of the Islands.' The First Day Cover has an illustration of Port Louis in 1829. The larger of the two stamps was used again on April 9, 1983, without the Vernet portrait but with the original words covered by a large Argentine flag, announcing the first anniversary of the 'recuperation' of all islands displayed.

Over the years the Falkland Islands stamp issues have dealt solely with themes that are more closely linked with home affairs. As we don't need to shout aloud where our allegiance resides, we can concentrate on portraying the more interesting aspects of the Falklands scene.

This makes our stamps unique to us and provides a reservoir of interest worldwide.



Mila arrested in Stanley

MILA, the Falklands flagged vessel alleged to have fished illegally in Australian waters was arrested in the Islands on Wednesday, having been ordered to Stanley by the Falkland Islands Government Fisheries Department.


Talking to Penguin News vesterday Director of Fisheries John Barton confirmed the vessel had been arrested by fishery officers. and that the investigation into the allegations had begun almost as soon the Mila had arrived in the **Falklands**

Asked how long the investigation was expected to take, Mr Barton was reluctant to comment but said, "It depends because these things can go a number of different ways.

Crown Counsel for the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) Graham Cripps told Penguin News, "The enquiry is ongoing but during the course of it, it was decided to arrest the vessel."

He said the vessel had not yet been charged with any offence but had been arrested under the powers of the Director of Fisheries. adding, "It is anticipated that a decision will be made with regard to any charges in the near future."

The Mila, part owned by a company (Prion Ltd.) belonging to

Falklands Councillor Mike Summers, is alleged to have been observed fishing illegally in the vicinity of Heard Island within the Australian Fishing Zone. A licensed fishing vessel, the Austral Leader, is reported to have pursued the Mila.

Austral Leader say crew of the Mila then attempted to hide the identity of their vessel. It is also reported that Austral Leader went on to recover the Mila's longlines under instruction from Australian fisheries control authorities.

Following the allegations FIG ordered Mila to return to the Islands to face an investigation into the in-

In a letter to Penguin News on October 6. Councillor Mike Summers said of the situation, "As far as my personal position is concerned I have always been very conscious of my responsibilities. and will be conscious of my responsibilities in respect of this alleged incident."

Vieirasa towed

AN Argentine longliner that caught fire 240 miles south east of Stanley is currently being towed towards the Falklands.

The Vieirasa Doce was fishing on the high seas when a fire started in the forward factory deck between 1 and 4 on Wednesday morning.

On board were a crew of 36 plus one female observer.

Falklands registered vessel Lyn went to the assistance of the Vieirasa Doce and all personnel were transferred.

A second Falklands registered vessel, the Argos Georgia also steamed to the assistance of the burning vessel but was informed by the Lyn that all of the crew had been transferred and no further help was needed

No injuries were sustained, but on arrival the crew will be accommodated and receive medical check

A spokesman for the Fisheries Department said yesterday (Thursday) they had no information regarding the extent of the damage, but the fire had been put out and a crew had been put aboard in an attempt to restart the engines of the Vieirasa Doce.

General Purposes Committee Meeting Report

Mobility allowances for some

SOME but not all individuals who suffer from impaired mobility are shortly to receive government funded assistance.

Talking to Penguin News this week Councillor Norma Edwards said Social Services had been asked to present a paper on mobility allowances, but due to workload this had not yet materialised

Childcare - financial support?

THE Chief Executive is to examine the possibility of financial support for nursery and child-care

It was reported in Penguin News lastweekthat Stanley'ssecondnursery school may have to close down due to lack of funds. Parents using the facility have expressed their concerns to councillors.

Councillor Edwards said the Chief Executive, "... has got that in hand and will be contacting people involved.

"Any proposals will then be placed before Executive Council and Standing Finance Committee."

Discrimination "unlawful" reminds AG

RACE discrimination is "unlawful," the public were reminded at a meeting hosted by councillors on Tuesday

At the meeting Councillor Edwards read a statement drafted by the Attorney General which responded to a question from a member of the public, asking whether it was Government or FIDC's policy to withdraw or withold assistance from businesses which do not allow access by Argentines to their property or services.

The statement said: "Persons or organisations that pursue a policy of not allowing access to their business property or services to Argentine nationals on the grounds of their nationality are acting unlawfully

"It is not the practice of the FIDC or Government to enquire into the policy (towards Argentines) of persons seeking financial assistance for the development of their business.

"Both the corporation and the government might however refuse financial assistance if that policy were part of the application in ques-

Asked by a member of the public if this meant that by not allowing Argentine citizens access to the Islands for many years the government had been acting illegally, the Attorney General explained that

 the policy which prevented Argentine citizens entering the Islands was a hostile act against the Argentine government and not the people, but,

 once Argentines were allowed lawfully into the Islands they should be treated like any other citizen of the world.

He explained that for a business to refuse a service to an Argentine ...purely because they were an Argentine citizen," would be race discrimination.

If an individual believes government policy should be one of isolation from Argentina then it follows they will object to councillors romancing Di Tella.

However as some councillors indicated, this is no longer policy; they had met him and worked beside him on the July 14 agreement, so as far as they were concerned it was courteous to receive him.

No, what really bored me rigid was the insistence, not of debating this long-standing but valid disagreement, but rather a few individuals taking up a large chunk of the meeting time to nit-pick about who Councillor Cockwell really spoke for when a few weeks before the visit he said councillors had made no plans to meet Di Tella.

When Councillor Cockwell made that statement in response to a question from myself early this month it was clear that as far as he was aware (a phrase he should have included perhaps?) there was no requirement for councillors to meet Di Tella - and indeed, he himself did not.

Councillor Cockwell's words were however, premature, and while I agree that such inefficient public relations generates confusion and mistrust, ultimately that is all it is - rubbish PR!

No doubt councillors will learn from this boob and, should there be any other such visits in the future, will meet as a body and make plans well in advance of questions from the press. One hopes rather more carefully laid plans, to which they will remain faithful.

But as far as the meeting went... personally Hilary I think you should have sent them all to their rooms without any supper!

See you in court

AT a public meeting on Tuesday. Cable and Wireless Business Unit Manager Brian Summers issued the strong challenge, "...we are happy to take on in court." people accusing the company of, "blocking call back services."

Mr Summers said C&W were prepared to go to court to prove, "we are not at fault".

For some months residents have experienced difficulties in using the cheaper telephone 'call-back' service which takes advantage of service providers such as C&W. This has lead to accusations that C&W are making use of a piece of equipment dedicated to blocking callbacks.

At the meeting on Tuesday C&W provided a statement responding to a suggestion by Barry Elsby that the company owns such a device, adding. "I believe I am correct in saying that to interfere with a legally placed telephone call is a criminal offence in the Falklands.

"If this is so. I believe there is enough circumstantial evidence of possible criminal activity to expect the Police to commence a criminal investigation.

"Is the Falklands Government or the Attorney General's Office planning to ask the Police to investigate?

"If not, why not?"

C&W say, "Cable & Wireless like most international telecommunications services providers employs traffic measuring equipment in the network.

"This is used to: record circuit occupancy, detect any congestion, identify any busy periods, etc.

"This information and data is used to dimension the international circuits so as to provide customers with an appropriate grade of service

"The data is also used in negotiations with our corresponding carriers so that our mutual capacity meets the requirements. "The equipment we have also detects any abuse of the network. Call back is one such abuse in our view."

"We have not however implemented any measures that would affect this type of traffic. Statements to this effect have been made publicly on numerous occasions. We have also separately assured Government of this in a number of meetings.

"The question we have been asked to date is - are we blocking call back services. The answer has been and remains no at this point in time.

"We have not to date been asked the question whether we have the capability. There is a subtle but important distinction here. Our answer to this question is - Yes we have the capability but we have not taken advantage of this facility so far. This is the crucial point.

"Cable and Wireless therefore deny using the equipment for the purpose of blocking calls. Even if they were doing so, the Attorney General does not believe that any criminal offence would have been committed

"Cable and Wireless allege that the call-back services to which the questioner refers are in breach of its monopoly and has called upon the Falkland Islands Government to take effective steps to prevent them operating in the Falkland Islands, but the Attorney General presently is inclined to believe that to do so might be in breach of the right of freedom of information guaranteed by the Constitution."

Following a debate on the matter during the public meeting Mr Summers indicated that because of the roundabout route of the callback system there were, "...lots of places along the route that these things can fall down."

He said the assumption appeared to always be that the fault was in the Falklands when it could very well be occurring elsewhere.

"Inappropriate" accommodation

CURRENT accommodation for elderly residents at the hospital is not appropriate, councillors acknowledged this week.

At the public meeting on Tuesday councillors were asked "Where have we got to in relation to an old people's home?"

Councillor Edwards read a statement from the Director of Health Services which commented that current accommodation was inappropriate. It began, "Executive Council considered the provision of services for elderly people two years ago and resolved that it was an inappropriate facility for Stanley.

It also claims, "...plans are being looked at to enable changes to be made."

The idea of another ward for old people was being considered, said Councillor Edwards, however a member of the public suggested that elderly citizens should have their own rooms in the hospital.

Councillors also pointed out that a great deal of help was now given to senior citizens in their own homes and noted that when questionnaires had been distributed with regard to an old people's home, many thought such a facility a good idea but said they personally would not use it.

says Chamber of Commerce

THE Falkland Islands Chamber of Commerce has publicly expressed concern about the level of service they are currently experiencing with DHL

Speaking to Penguin News this week. Chamber manager Bruce Wilks reported there have been numerous delays and, "...a significant amount of parcels have gone missing and not arrived.

Most parcels which have disappeared contained items with good potential for resale such as PCs, video players and digital video disc players.

Mr Wilks explained that the Chamber of Commerce will be negotiating with DHL to ensure the situation is remedied. He said, "We hope that DHL will be able to rectify the situation which has been going on for some months. If they can't, we will have to come to a realisation that we may have no alternative but for the service to cease. However, we sincerely

hope this won't be the case."

Mr Wilks stated that the problems were in no way due to a lack of commitment from the Chamber of Commerce and that blame lay solely with DHL.

Mr Wilks stressed that the service will continue into the future: We will do everything we possibly can to continue the service but it can't go on as it is.

We appreciate the importance of the DHL service to the Islands and how much it is used but at the same time we realise it has to be better than it currently is. It can't continue as it is: that would be unfair to our clients.

On a more positive note, Mr. Wilks commented that mail order company Ezibuy has begun to use DHL for their Falklands orders. He said that parcels from the Australasian company are arriving in the Islands very quickly, sometimes within days of ordering.

DHL problems to be remedied Sam's the new face of Falklands PR

Public Works update

SINCE our last report on August 4, sections of the Public Works Department have been involved in preparing works in readiness for the Summer season.

Roads

Road construction has started on programme. On East Falkland the team continue heading to Saladero which they envisage reaching by mid November. On the West the team continue from where they left off last season at Racecourse Ridge. At the same time general road maintenance on unsurfaced roads on East and West Falkland is now in full swing with grading and regravellingtaking place.

A small maintenance crew is working well on Stanley roads and they are starting to catch up on the backlog of minor works. The road surfacing crew have completed the footpath on Snake Hill, and commenced road surfacing on phase 5b of East Stanley housing development. When completed this phase will provide another 9 plots for private development. This phase will be completed one month ahead of schedule.

Quarry

The continuous wet weather over the winter has reduced production capacity at the Quarry as it affects processing materials through the crushing train. The sand washing plant also had to cease operating on a number of occasions due to freezing weather conditions. Nevertheless the Quarry has continued to provide sufficient material to meet demand, and last month provided nearly a thousand tonnes of bagged aggregates for Morrisons and Turners for delivery to BAS, South Georgia.

Capital programmes

Capital works are continuing and the renovations and alterations to Gilbert House undertaken by Stanley Decorating and Building Services Ltd were completed on August 15. External lighting in the car park has been reinstalled.

Once the weather improves the remaining minor works will be completed. Morrison (Falklands) Ltd, under the partnership arrangement with FIG, along with their local subcontractors are pushing ahead with works to the Town Hall Car Park, FIDC Car Park, the FIDF buildings and the Visitors Centre.

The FIDF Drill Hall was completed, ready for occupation on September 22 and works are continuing on the Social Club. The project is due for completion in December 2000.

The Town Hall Car Park alterations are progressing well and are ahead of schedule. Work has commenced on the Stanley Visitors Centre and the foundations are currently being poured. This project is due for completion in February 2001.

Moving on to West Falkland, Morrison(Falklands)Ltd have completed the West Point Island jetty repairs and will shortly be moving onto Dunnose Head. Repairs to jetties and the building of ramps are scheduled to take place at Golding Island, Saunders Islands and Weddell Island over the next few months.

Highways Section

A large quantity of work has been done by the Highways Section around the periphery of Stanley Airport, clearing and tidying hardstandings and removing old building bases and general debris to make the area safer and more visually attractive and assist the regeneration of vegetation.

Mary Itill has been greatly improved with remedial landscaping works having been completed to approaches and surrounding land, and screening bunds formed along the southern limits. Waste previously placed in the quarry is now moved back to within the lower area, compacted, and as far as possible covered with clay and topsoil.

Access within the quarry has been improved with the formation of a hard track using recovered material and with the co-operation of users should remain a much better facility to use. New operating procedures to improve placing of waste have been implemented and to date co-operation from users has been good.

Separationout of some waste has been ongoing for some time, with waste oils particularly being placed in separate storage in readiness for use in a suitable boiler unit which has now been installed at the Market Garden.

Work has also been done in the Stanley Airport area by the Property and Municipal Section; cleaning up former fire training areas in two locations. This involved removing contaminated earth and aggregate, the latter being used to improve access into Eliza Cove tip.

Staff training

PWD staff have lately been involved in training courses. Certificates of competence in Safety Awareness and for Plant Operation have recently arrived from the Construction Industry Training Board for those who completed the safety awareness training and plant operator assessments in April/May of this year.

One or more Intermediate Construction Certificates have been awarded to those trained and tested, and a certificate of unit credit for a Construction Certificate (an NVQ II equivalent) awarded to one staff member. Several others are also very close to obtaining sufficient units in order to gain the National Vocational Qualification.

The trainers commented very favourably on the attitude of the personnel and skills displayed.

Eight PWD staff have been selected to undertake a Supervisory Management Development Course which began in late September. A trainer and an assessor from the United Kingdom recently visited the Islands to undertake a week long introductory training seminar which was both challenging and interesting for all involved.

The trainers will return to the Islands in January for a two week period for phase 2 of the course. Everyone involved is working towards an NVQ level 3 in Supervisory Management.

It is anticipated that eventually all FIG Foremen/Supervisors will undertake the course which is expected to cover a period of eight months.

Nature controlling nature

IN an attempt to move towards being 'green'.nature is being employed by a local company in favour of pesticides.

Stanley Growers Ltd have adopted a more friendly method of pest control, using natural predators.

According to Tim Miller of Stanley Growers, We are using nature to control nature, using natural predators of the pest insects.

"Scientists identify natural predators that exist in the wild in various countries, some in UK, and then breed them up in captivity. They are then released into greenhouses where they will do their business."

Mr Miller described the natural pest control process: "We have sachets which hold miles in fine sawdust. The mites arrive in the Islands immature, as pupae, which enables them to survive the journey. Over the next few days they will hatch and then crawl over the plants.

"Our main problem is thrip. These mites will take over and destroy the thrip larvae. Next week we are expecting another natural predator - a miniature wasp. This will attack the adult thrip

"It is standard practice in the UK: MAF accept it as do the Department of Agriculture."

Mr Miller assured that introducing species for such purposes would not be harmful to the Falklands environment, saying the insects would not survive outside of the greenhouse. He said that if they did escape. "...their natural food is not around and they will die anyway."

When asked if this is an attempt by Stanley Growers Ltd to become 100% organic, Mr Miller responded. "It is our own part of moving as far as we can towards it. Stanley Growers cannot be organic as hydroponics is an inorganic process. But what we are doing is becoming as clean and green as we can." He added, "It's environmentally sustainable."

Mr Miller was quick to reassure that any knock on effect regarding the cost of his produce would be minimal. "It will cost me more to do but you have to move with the times and hopefully I may sell more produce as a result."

MPs to visit Stanley and Camp

THE five parliamentarians who will visit the Falklands in early November will visit the Camp as well as meet with councillors and government officials.

The group (three from the Labour Party and two from the Conservative Party) are scheduled to attend a military briefing and there will be the opportunity for them to meet the private sector.

According to a press release from the Councillors Office, "As usual it is hoped that the Parliamentarians will be able to meet as many people as possible."

Council Chamber in Stanley on Monday November 6 between 6:00 and 7:00pm,

Questions for oral answer

Operational matters not remit of TAC

AT Legislative Council on Tuesday Councillor Edwards enquired of Councillor Summers whether "...it was a decision of the Transport Advisory Committee (TAC) that only two of the West Roads Gang are allowed to work Saturdays, namely the foreman and the mechanic?

She added. "If it was not the decision of the Transport Committee. can he enlighten us as to who made this decision?

Councillor Summers said it was not a decision of the TAC explaining that it was an "operational" matter and the responsibility of the Director of Public Works.

Supplementary information from the DPW said. "The PWD is operating within various constraints including budget allocations and overtime restrictions

"At the same time it seeks to ensure a degree of parity between the hours worked by the teams on East

and West Falkland. Some leeway has to be made for people whose normal place of residence is East Falkland out who are required to work on the West. It is considered unreasonable to expect them to stay in the road camp all weekend; they are therefore permitted to work on Saturdays. The

remainder of the West Roads Con-

struction team return to their normal

place of residence at weekends as does

the entire team on East Falkland. It was noted however that plans may change once the construction season was fully underway.

Councillor Summers commented that if there was a view amongst councillors that, "...the Director of Public Works is not using the resources he has been given in the most efficient manner then they should take that up either through the Public Works Management Committee or the Standing Finance Committee.

Any need for transport review?

COUNCILLOR John Birmingham asked Councillor Mike Summers if the Transport Advisory Committee had agreed there was a need for another transport review, to be carried out by former FIDC General Manager Hugh Normand, and also what date the agreement was reached

Councillor Summers replied that the Transport Committee (TAC) had not been asked if there ought to be another transport review. "...therefore the answer to his question is in the negative." He added that he did not doubt that the question would arise, "...on Thursday afternoon when the next meeting of the committee takes place.

"I would expect that the committee would take cognisance of the progress that has been made so far in the transport policy of the Islands and there does appear to be a need for a review and update of transport policy, which job is the responsibility of the General Manager FIDC and has been for many years.

He said issues such as the reevaluation of time scales and capital costs. "...and possibly a further review of cooperation with the military on coastal shipping services," would be discussed at the TAC. However, as the Chair he could not see the need for a wholescale transport

Road alterations: no discussion with public

REPLYING to a question from Councillor Cockwell on the subject of consultation processes relating to alterations to roads. Councillor Halford said there was no established consultation process for alterations to roads and footpaths.

She said, "Generally new roads in Stanley are constructed to long agreed standards which include width of the carriage-way, width of footpath, minimum radii and slack distances.

Councillor Cockwell asked, "In view of the controversy involving alterations to East Fitzrov Road, are there any proposals to involve local residents in the future?

Councillor Halford replied, "Regarding the subject road, the design was originally to these standards. Unforeseen ground conditions precluded these standards being adhered to without incurring considerable expense in moving the substation and a buried high voltage cable

"As a result a compromise solution was reached. Numerous alterations and upgrades have been carried out previously without consultation

No progress on Albemarle

THE question of 'any progress' in the disposal of the remaining oil at Albemarle sealing station was once again raised by Councillor Birming-

Councillor Halford responded saying oil contaminated with water is presently stored in 81 fifty gallon drums at Gordon Lines. She said there had been no progress in the actual disposal of the oil.

She went on to list avenues being considered for disposal, noting the advantages and disadvantages of all.

or objection. Examples are Dairy Paddock Road, Jeremy Moore Avenue.

Capricorn Road and Beaver Road There are no plans to involve local residents in the future as it is felt that lengthy stalemate situations could arise from individual objections.

"Under the General Development Order 1991, road maintenance and improvements is specifically excluded from the requirement for planning permission. If a consultation process is required then the simplest way forward is to include any alterations to roads on the agenda of the planning and building committee."

Councillor Clifton asked that Councillor Halford "...ensure that in future the Town Planning Building Committee have regard for all of the works that are planned by Public Works Department and ensure that there is the fullest consultation within the draft town plan as it currently

Councillor Birmingham suggested that the public have access to a list of the programme of improvements to roads and footpaths Councillor Halford said this was available to the public if they wished to see it.

Morrisons site will be tidied

COUNCILLOR Edwards confirmed this week that when Morrisons vacate the land on the north side of the Airport Road (east of the Trough) soil from East Stanley development is to be used to landscape the area.

Councillor Birmingham was unhappy that PWD or a partner of PWD had not acquired planning permission for dumping spoil in an area such as the Common. He asked that Councillor Edwards look into the matter, which she agreed to do.

Motion: Councillors debate but one-way system to go ahead

AMOTION by Councillor Birming-A MULTION barrens and Briting hamasking for the proposal for a onehamasking to the proposation a oneway system by Legislative Council this week.

Seconded by Councillor Lewis Clifton it was moved that, "this House calls upon the Government to abandon its proposals for the introduction of a one-way traffic system in central Stanley

Councillor Birmingham spoke first saying he was not against oneway systems as such, but "... the decision to create a one-way system around Stanley is to my mind the wrong one, but not only to my mind At the last public meeting at which there were at least 45 people, the show of hands overwhelmingly showed the way the public were thinking of the idea."

His main argument against the system was "the poor cyclist, adult but mainly the youngsters who ride around the town. I don't think anybody has given a thought to them

Councillor Edwards supported the Motion, saying she agreed "wholeheartedly" with Councillor Birmingham.

"Daft scheme"

Councillor Summers also opposed the introduction of what he termed. "this daft scheme". He said he felt there had been "__insufficient thought to the very many consequences there will be of the introduction of a oneway system and I believe that that has already started to filter through to members of the Executive Council who hadn't thought of how they will inconvenience very many people by the introduction of this initiative.

He felt it would increase the speed of traffic on the front road and on John Street, "... because if you don't have counterbalancing traffic people will be free to move more quickly.

The amount of inconvenience to the public at the moment is restricted to about five or ten minutes once or twice a day and that is not a very serious inconvenience I think for anybody. However the decision was debated at some length in General Purposes Committee where there was a clear split and the matter was properly referred to Executive Council who made the decision. I think therefore the members of the public should know that the members of the Executive Council take all the credit for this scheme if it turns out to be successful and all of the approbrium if it turns out to be a disaster.

"Taking short term view" Councillor Cockwell said he believed those members were "...taking a very short term view.

He claimed that, "...the problems of traffic management in Stanley have been recognised and I think all the members of the General Purposes Committee agreed that traffic management needed to be looked at."

He said there was public consultation which had been referred to the Planning and Building Committee from which had come the recommendation of a one-way system.

He said, "... we have to take the long term view and the long term view as far as I am concerned is that traffic is going to build up; we are going to have problems. We all know that possibly off-street parking is the answer but we also know that it is extremely expensive." He felt funds could instead be spent on much needed road improvements.

"Severe problems"

He believed there would be more vehicles and more tourists, and indicated that such a combination could bring "severe problems and somebody is liable to get injured."

We all know that an injury to a tourist can become a very serious problem, and very expensive."

Councillor Cheek who also supported the idea of a one-way system said a six month trial "...which was all that was agreed in Executive Council seemed to me a reasonable compromise. No great expenditure would be involved if simple temporary signs were used. Right now the need is even more clear. It seems that we can anticipate several months disruption with roadworks on Ross Road, with three separate building projects going on. I believe that a one-way system is a sensible and a safe way to keep traffic flowing and reduce the potential for chaos.

"Red herring"

She described Councillor Summers' suggestion that the traffic would speed up as "...a bit of red herring, because everyone knows that along John Street vehicles have to give way to the hills going North/South through the John Street crossings.

She said, "However if my rather short sighted honourable colleagues are unable to see the benefits of a one-way system then I fear we will see Ross Road virtually grind to a halt, and the public at large will suffer from that short-sighted view."

Councillor Halford supported the proposed one-way system and agreed with Councillor Cheek's suggestion that Ross Road traffic would grind to a halt "Nightmare"

She commented "We have the public jetty complex being built at the moment and an awful lot of construction traffic around there. With the tourists coming in as well this is going to become somewhat of a nightmare for this season."

Councillor Halford noted that the FIC was building a new store "just off Ross Road," the Town Hall car park was under construction and Ross Road was going to be repaired. She believed that a one-way system would assist in solving problems that might arise from all of those works.

Councillor Luxton agreed with Councillor Cheek that if a one way system worked in 1982, "I fail to see any reason why it shouldn't now.' He also felt it would be safer for cyclists to be going with the flow of traffic rather than fighting their way through opposing traffic "...ducking in and out of parked cars."

He felt an increase in speed would be welcome because it would be. the difference between zero and at least some forward motion in some cases 1

Councillor Clifton dismissed many of the arguments for the system saying "...I've never seen so many red herrings come out of a can in one go around this table... we have been hypothesising on road traffic in 1982 on the basis that John Street collapsed and otherwise it would have gone on. We've got a whole bundle of road works and other construction programme works that nobody knew about when the decision was made.

He also pointed out that the intention was to introduce a one-way system to a street where there was "no walkway" (St. Mary's Walk).

He believed it would cause considerable disruption during the summer, referring to the scheme as "nonsense" and a "half-baked idea" that would cause further congestion and not alleviate the problem.

As a result of an evenly split vote on the Motion it was not carried.

Speeches to the Motion for Adjournment

Constitutional development - support for single constituency says Cheek

COUNCILLOR Jan Cheek strongly supported the idea of one constituency during her speech to the Motion for Adjournment on Tuesday.

Talking of constitutional development. Councillor Cheek noted that there was still time for people, "...to have their ideas put forward and discussed." She said interesting suggestions received and discussed so far by councillors, "...from quite a cross section of the community include, as well as matters in the constitution, also matters concerning the arrangement for voting and of constituen-

"There is considerable support, for example, for the idea of a single constituency. The town has a majority of members on this council and that has not prevented massive support being put into the farms over the life of this council." (Councillor Luxton later commented that he had found considerable opposition to the idea of a single constituency.)

Councillor Cheek commented, "I can understand that some Camp residents feel that being in a single constituency might have the effect of disenfranchising them but I doubt that would happen. I believe they would have a much larger pool of candidates from which to choose and already residence in Camp is not a requirement for a Camp member.

"I would still prefer that system. I've spoken about it before and I believe it could unify the Falklands in the way that I regard as very impor-

She said although she could see

some merits in the idea of a Town Council she could not see the merit of "...adding another layer of bureaucracy to an already complex sys-

CouncillorCheek felt that the proposals for an Ombudsman and a Public Service Commission could assist with public complaints. Currently, she said, some complaints were going straight to councillors and bypassing the relevant departments.

She favoured more responsibility for councillors for their portfolios but acknowledged the argument that in giving more power to councillors, ".. a crooked councillor could do untold damage." However she added, ...surely that's a warning to people to be careful who they elect.'

Councillor Halford later spoke

positively of the idea of elected representativeshaving more responsibility for their portfolios, and she felt this was what "people" wanted, as well as for councillors to be more "answerable" Enshrine self-determination

Councillor Summers said em-

phatically that he would like to see the right to self determination enshrined in the Islands' constitution. ...in such a way that it is an obligation on the British government to defend our right to self determination.

"I am not yet convinced that its presence in the preamble serves its purpose and I think that it is an issue that we need to take up with legal advisors at the FCO and to determine a strong recommendation from

Councillor Luxton commented that he really didn't care about Dr. Di Tella and was pleased that the one-way system seems to have raised more dust than Dr. Di Tella."

Councillor Summers supported the idea of meeting Dr Di Tella saying by signing the agreement on July 14. "... and by coming here and meeting the Governor and councillors in their office was to recognise the administration of the Falkland Islands as it exists here and that is a step forward."

He criticised the Governor for meeting Di Tella when "...it wasn't discussed with councillors.'

URUGUAYAN FLOCK KEEPS FALLING

LAST July Uruguay recorded its lowest flock number in history with just 13 million head, having lost 1.5 million in the last twelve months (June '99-June '00), according to official numbers from the Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock.

Ten years ago, Uruguay had 24 million sheep.

Extraction percentages also indicate that farmers continue to diversify and flock numbers are expected to drop another million head in the next twelve months.

Cattle on the other hand and in spite of a very serious drought in certain areas of the country, remains at a steady 10.5 million head, mostly Hereford.

Uruguay's previous flock record low was in 1974, with 14 million head, when sheep farming began to recover and numbers grew steadily until 1991, reaching 25.6 million.

LAGOS STRONG STANDING

CHILEAN president Ricardo Lagos managed to dissolve a three day truckers strike that was beginning to threaten supplies to some cities and had become his government's main challenge since taking office.

Lagos' strong standing with the truckers. — he refused to discuss under force — should help the ruling coalition in the municipal elections of this Sunday, although opinion polls indicate the Conservative opposition will have a good showing in some of the country's main cities, particularly in Santiago.

The strike ended after Mr. Lagos promised a round of discussions in two weeks time when the truckers demands will be considered, mainly a 50% reduction in fuel taxes.

The stoppage involved 6.500 trucks and losses were estimated to be 300 million US dollars, however the strike began losing support when truckers decided to block some sections of the vital Panamericanroute that runs all along the country from the Peruvian border in the north to Magallanes in the extreme south.

By ending the transport conflict Mr. Lagos was able to neutralize another strike brewing in ports, but he still faces protests from teachers and health services, including doctors

Mr. Lagos, after five months in office, has a 61% support according to the latest opinion polls, but the ruling coalition soverall showing for this Sunday's municipal election is expected to be below 50%.

SPAIN RESTRUCTURES INDUSTRY

GIVEN the growing difficulties to keep the current overseas fisheries level, Spain will invest 7,500 million pesetas. (approximately 62 million US dollars) in restructuring the fishing industry and diversifying regional economies, according to La Voz de Galicia, one of Galicia's main newspapers.

Spanish Agriculture, Fisheries and Food Minister Miguel Arias Cañete, announced in Cádiz that the financing for the restructuring will come from a contingency fund specially created following the problems concerning the lack of a new fisheries agreement between Europe and Morocco.

Europe and Morocco.

The 201 strong Spanish-Galician fleet is also having trouble because the European hake quota is rapidly ending and many vessels will be forced to moor by the end of October. Next year's quota won't be agreed until next December.

However Mr Arias was overall optimistic about future agreements in other areas such as Tunisia, Central America. Mauritania and Senegal

Mr. Arias also revealed that next year's national budget allocates additional funds for the fishing industry restructuring process, which "is a long term operation"

The funds are particularly important for Galicia, where most of the Spanish fleet is concentrated.

But since the regional president of Galicia, Mr. Manuel Fraga is the main supporter of the current Spanish ruling alliance in Madrid, political observers are believe restructuring funds will "be generous."

STRONG BRITISH SUPPORT

BRITISH INDUSTRY and Trade Secretary Stephen Byers during a one day visit to Buenos Aires confirmed the United Kingdom's full support to the current Argentine open market policies and anticipated a British "investment shock" in the coming months that could easily reach 480 million US dollars.

Although Mr. Byers did not reveal names of British interests, the Argentine press named P & O and National Grid. P&O is one of the main operators in the privatised Buenos Aires port and is planning to expand its container business from 350,000 to a million containers per year. National Grid is in the electricity distribution business and wants to set an optic fibre network.

During his full day agenda Mr. Byers met in Government House with President De la Rúa and his top cabinet Secretaries. (Machinea, Economy: Rodriguez Giavarini, Foreign Affairs: Javier Tizado, Industry), as well as the CEO of the main British companies with investments in Argentina. Mr. Byers revealed that several British companies are interested in joint ventures in the tourist, telecommunications, energy and financial services industries.

Mr. Byers also surprised the

Argentine government when he said Britain was interested in participating in some of the works contemplated in the "Infrastructure Program", recently created to help boost employment in Argentina.

Following the high level meetings it was announced that Britain and Argentina will have a common standing in international trade conferences, favouring the opening of world markets and an end to subsidies and tariff manipulation.

DE LA RÚA VISITS SPAIN

ARGENTINE president Fernando De la Rúa, his main cabinet ministers and a delegation of over eighty businessmen began last Tuesday an official four days visit to Spain, the country that has become the second most important investor in Argentina.

The trip has a main objective: increase trade and attract to capital hungry Argentina, an additional seven billion US dollars investment during the next three years.

President De la Rúa will be meeting King Juan Carlos, President José María Aznar and several regional heads of governments with very close links with Argentina, such as Manuel Fraga from Galicia and Jordi Pujol from Catalunia.

Mr. De la Rúa who besides politics and law is a master of the Spanish language will have the rare privilege of lecturing in the Royal Academy of the Spanish language. He is also scheduled to visit the small fishing village of Bueu in Galicia. from where his ancestors three generations back emigrated to Argentina.

In Madrid, in the seat of the Spanish Business Confederation, Mr. De la Rúa will face his greatest test, he will give a conference on "Current and future bilateral economic relations" and answer questions from Spain's top one hundred businessmen.

Following recent events in Argentina, it will be a first rate challenge for Mr. De la Rúa and his whole delegation.

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

FOOT AND MOUTH IN URUGUAY

AN outbreak of foot and mouth disease was reported this week in a small dairy farm in the north of Uruguay a few miles away from the Brazilian border.

Officials from the Uruguayan Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock have isolated the area and will proceed to apply the "sanitary rifle" to all the farm's cattle, approximately lifty cows and calves, and hogs which are believed to have been responsible for the spread of the disease.

Great areas of southern Brazil have been isolated for weeks because of foot and mouth outbreaks, mostly starting in hogs.

However hogs are staple food for many poor families in the country and also a great smuggling temptation in Argentina and Uruguay, since they are much cheaper in Brazil.

Uruguayan authorities have ordered an immediate inquiry into the incident because since outbreaks were first reported two months ago in Argentina. Paraguay and Brazil, the country closed its borders to all food imports, particularly live animals. Even the Uruguayan Army was patrolling along the border which is practically open with just landmarks and a few border posts.

The incident is most unfortunate since it comes in the wake of an American-Canadian-Mexican sanitary inspection tour recommending that Uruguay should not be excluded as beef exporter to Nafta members, in spite of the spread of foot and mouth disease in neighbouring countries.

SPECTACULAR WHALE SEASON

AN unprecedented number of whales and the fact they are so playful and indifferent to humans is turning this year's whale sightseeing season in Patagonia into a spectacular event.

An estimated 600/650 whales every year migrate to Península Valdés in the Argentine province of Chubut where they mate, calve and mothers teach the newly born how to swim and dive.

The season that extends from May to December, has become an international attraction and thousands of tourists flock every year to Península Valdés to watch

whales from the coast line or from boats that sail just next to the harmless giant sea mammals, some of them 16 metres long and weighing up to forty tons.

However this year local observes insist the number of whales has increased and they are so playful and indifferent to humans that they can be seen just a hundred feet from the coast or nearby cliffs in groups of up to twenty.

"They vegot to used to us, here they feel safe and protected, they don't feel threatened and we can sail between them without much disturbance", remarked. Jorge Schmid, a local resident who earns a living showing tourists around the bay.

This season an exceptional number of migrating whales was also reported last September along the Uruguayan coast in Maldonado.

BRITISH SUBS RECALLED

ALL twelve Trafalgarclass British nuclear attack submarines have been recalled following the discovery of minor fissures in the reactor's refrigeration system of the HMS Tireless docked in Gibraltar since last May.

A Royal Navy spokesman admitted that "a minor escape of nuclear material was detected in the HMS Tireless, which for the moment we believe does not involve a health nor environment risk, but we want to be totally certain".

The spokesmandid not specify if the fissure was a structural problem.

London, Gibraltar and Madrid have been at odds over the long and suspicious stay of the damaged HMS Tireless.

One of the Trafalgar submarines was involved in a Tomahawk missile attack during the Kosovo campaign, although their mission is mainly to protect the Vanguard Class submarines that carry the long range Trident nuclear missiles.

MILITARY BUDGETS DOWN

WITH the end of the Cold War and border disputes, and the shortage of resources, most Latinamerican military budgets have fallen dramatically in the last fifteen years. Brazil's Air Force is mostly grounded because of lack of funds and Argentina has been selling bases and other properties to keep the Armed Forces minimally

operational.

With the exception of Cuba, Colombia, involved in a long running bloody internal conflict and Chile that has a pegged budget, all other countries have undergone a drastic change turning Latinamerica into the world's less militarised region plus free of nuclear weapons.

In Argentina the military budget today barely represents 1% of the Gross Domestic Product. GDP, down from 5% in the eighties. In Brazil it's down to 1.8% and even Colombia that is fighting guerrillas and the drug barons simultaneously, it represents 2.6% of GDP.

Only Chilean Armed Forces because of a constitutional clause from Pinochet's time have managed to partially avoid the resources cap.

BBC ENGLISH FOR ARGENTINA

BBC will give free access to English language teaching by Internet to all Argentine school children following an agreement between the British media company and Argentina's Ministry of Education.

BBC World Service Officer Mark Byford signed this week in Buenos Aires the agreement that includes the software and English teaching modules that will be incorporated to the Internet Argentine education page, www.educ.ar.

Mr. Byford said that he was most encouraged that BBC with its programs, "Classic on line", could participate in a joint teaching effort of such dimension.

Argentine Eduation Minister Hugo Juri said the agreement had two main aspects, "social justice and access to a global world for all Argentine children".

Argentina will match the operation with a 240 million US dollars three years program to connect all schools with Internet.

Mr. Byford is in Buenos Aires for the "BBC Week in Argentina" that also includes a British film festival at the British Art Centre.

RECOVERY PROGRAM

WITH the political crisis that rocked the country gradually accommodating to new circumstances, the Argentine governmentlaunchedthis week an aggressive recovery program aimed at attracting investments, getting the economy rolling again and creating jobs.

The program includes fiscal incentives, tax cuts, regional diversification and production promotion, but is conditioned to the passing of the budget, —with more expenditure reductions—, and the incorporation of a "strategic partner" for the country's main bank, government managed Banco de Nación, that acts as a development and investment institution.

Both conditions are subject to Congressional good will, and are a test for the reborn ruling Alianza that seems in the path of internal reconciliation after Mr. Fernando de Santibañes was replaced as head of the Intelligence Service, and Mr. Chacho Alvarez, the former vice-president pledged to keep working for the government even out of office.

Mr. Alvarez detonated the current political situation when he resigned following a cabinet reshuffle that confirmed some Ministers and key posts in President De la Rúa's administration that are believed to have been involved in a vote buying scandal in the Argentine Senate, particularly Mr. Santibañes a personal friend and advisor of Mr. De la Rúa and his family.

Mr. Santibañes before resigning said in a television program that investors will not come to Argentina if the ruling Alianza yields to its junior partner (Socialist oriented) Frepaso demands, that happens to have Mr. Alvarez as its leader.

The recovery program has the backing of international banks and financial institutions and an Argentine delegation will be visiting United States and Canada to convince investors of the merits of the initiative.

President De la Rúa is currently in Spain with a similar purpose.

Argentina needs a billion US dollars in fresh funds in the next two months and 19 billion in 2001 to balance the budget and honour international commitments.

One of the chapters in the program creates a specific Register for oil companies and recommends provincial governments to attract investments by eliminating royalties from unexplored hydrocarbon basins.

Besides Congressional foot dragging concerning further budget reductions, the recovery program faces a sceptic Argentine public opinion. According to a recent opinion poll, 60% of Argentines believe their personal economic situation will not improve in the next twelve months, and 53% answered things are worse than a year ago.

Strangely enough, the timing of the program coincides with the victory in the polls of the Alianza.

A year ago, October 24th, the newly created Alianza, an electoral combination of Radicales and left leaning Frepaso, with the De la Rúa-Alvarez ticket defeated the Peronists ousting a decade of Menem government.

Mr. De la Rúa and Mr. Alvarez campaigned promising an end to corruption, open government and the recovery of the economy and employment.

Falklands invasion foreign office "collusion" allegation

AN allegation of collusion between the British Foreign Office and Argentina over the 1982 Falkland Islands invasion providing for an immediate British surrender has been rejected as "untrue" by the Falklands Governor at the time, Sir

Rex Hunt.

The allegation has been made posthumously by a senior Conservative politician who later became a Defence Minister, Alan Clark, who died recently. His controversial Diaries currently being published in the Times quote him as writing on April 5, 1982, three days after the invasion: "I am certain that there has been collusion between the Foreign Office and the Argentine over this whole affair. Why were there no casualties among the Royal Marines? Seventy-five determined men, as the (Second World War) Battle of Arnhem demonstrated, to take but one example, can hold off greatly superior numbers just using small arms and bazookas from drains and cellars in territory that they know.

"I have started the rumour that there were scaled orders to the Governor to be opened when the invasion started, and that these orders were for him to declare an immediate ceasefire. I believe this

to be true.

"I also believe that unofficial representations were made by the Foreign Office to the Argentine indicating that all would be well provided no British blood were

shed. And what is more, I believe these unofficial contacts may still be taking place

These allegations would be sensational if they had any credibility. But Sir Rex Hunt told Mercopress there is no truth in them. They are "rubbish." he said.

His version of events are very different. He received no such sealed orders. He and his small contingent of Royal Marines valiantly resisted before surrendering to save lives. He had no sealed orders about surrendering. The invasion came as a surprise. He received a terse telegram from the Foreign Office in London, on the eve of invasion, declaring: "We have apparently reliable evidence that an Argentine Task Force will gather off Cape Pembroke (Stanley Harbour entrance) early tomorrow morning. You will wish to make your dispositions accordingly." Sir Rex famously declared: "The silly buggers are coming!

In his last morale-boosting broadcast before he was evicted. Sir Rex gave Islanders this pledge: "I wish you all the best of luck and. rest assured, the British will be

Alan Clark's reminiscence s are carried in a Times article across two pages under the headline: "Adrenalin Rushes over the Falklands." His first diary entry, on the day of the invasion, reads: "We have lost the Falklands. It's all over. We're a Third World country.

no good for anything."
His April 3rd entry ridicules the reaction of the Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher in her report to Parliament. He describes the Opposition Members of Parliament as. "laughing and sneering. She changed gear and gabbled. Far too fast she rattled off what was clearly a Foreign Office brief, without any declamatory or even punitive action.

He is even more critical of Defence Secretary John Nott whom he refers to as "Poor Old Notters' and describes as "a disaster" who stammered and stuttered and garbled. He faltered and fluttered and fumbled ... against a constant roaring of disapproval and contempt."

At a Conservative Party meeting afterwards, Clark says he asked the Foreign Secretary, Lord Carrington. a long, sneering question about the failure of British intelligence....Poor Notters was still so rattled and blubbery that he leant across and answered it, while Carrington sat staring at me in haughty silence."

Clark said he went to see the former Labour Prime Minister, Lord Callaghan, whom he describes as being "gloomy about the longterm prospects about defending the Islands. But he did agree that it was essential to punish the Argentines and to sink some of their ships before negotiations restarted.

"He (Callaghan) was very critical of the way the Foreign

Office handled the whole affair, said the administration was riddled with incompetence, and the Ministry of Defence was a mess. Nobody there could think creatively". Clark also quotes a former Thatcher Minister. Norman St John-Stevas, as saving: "Have you ever seen such a Government? So many nonentities. It really is pathetic. It would be farcical if it were not so tragic" The Diaries speak of some senior Conservatives having "an implacable hatred" of Margaret Thatcher. "They are within an ace. they think, of bringing her government down. If by some miracle the expedition succeeds. they know, and dread, that she will be established for ever as a national hero'

The article is illustrated by pictures of the Foreign Secretary. Lord Carrington, who resigned immediately, taking responsibility for what he admitted was a failure of diplomacy to foresee and prevent the invasion; the Defence Secretary, Sir John Nott, whose economy cutbacks in the Royal Navy and decision to withdraw the Antarctic ice patrol vessel, HMS Endurance, encouraged the Argentine Military Junta to believe Britain would not resist; and of Lord Callaghan, the former Labour Prime Minister.

The Times articles are extracts from the Diaries, published in book form on October 12.

WOOL REPORT: for the week ending Saturday 21 October

Australia returned to three days of auctions this week. On Tuesday the EMI gained a cent, another four cents were added on Wednesday and a jump of eight cents was achieved on Thursday, to close the week up 13 cents at 742 A cents per kg. With fine wool generally leading this EMI level of 742 is the new high point of the season to date in Australian dollar terms

In South Africa the Cape Wool Merino Indicator lost one percent to end at 2117 SA cents/kg clean.

In New Zealand the Fine Indicator gained 29 cents to 1710 NZ cents, the Medium Indicator lost another 14 cents to 569 NZ cents whilst the

Strong Indicator recovered 15 cents to 454 NZ cents.

The British wool auction only cleared about 47 percent with reserve prices kept firm. The UK indicator was down a penny at 72 p/kg. Sales this year have been sufficient for short-lived downward fluctuations to be resisted.

Currencies & Interest Rates

For much of the latter part of the week, the Australian dollar was trading at 2.77 AS/£ whilst the New Zealand dollar was at 3.66 NZ\$/£. both weaker than last week. These currency movements continue to negate part of the increases in the Australian wool market, when trading is in the relatively strong sterling currency.

Final payments to all Farm Principals for the 1999/2000 season wool clip were concluded on or before Friday of this week (20/10/00) and included various insurance payments. Financial statements have been prepared for all farms and are being airmailed today. The 1999/2000 season has thus been concluded about two months earlier than last year. illustrating that despite the low wool prices so drastically influenced by market and currency factors. Falkland Wool Growers Ltd have an excellent customer base for speciality Falkland wool Enquires continue and we are seeking additional volumes of wool for 2000/2001 to satisfy



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Opticians visit - November 2000 by Dr Richard Davies

THE opticians' six monthly visit will take place in November with eye tests from Wednesday 8 through to Tuesday 21. Tristar nermitting

permitting.

Mr Alex Harden, who was here

last November, will be carrying out the tests. He is in fact a consultant ophthalmologist so we are fortunate to have him back. In addition to the usual eye tests he has agreed to spend a few extra days to see people with specific eye problems such as glaucoma.

Not surprisingly people get confused about the terminology. An optician is someone trained to provide glasses and contact lenses. An ophthalmic optician does the testing and a dispensing optician provides the glasses. Optometrist is a new name for optician. An ophthalmologist or ophthalmic surgeon is a doctor who has specialised in eye diseases. They can also do eye tests for glasses. Refraction means testing the eye for glasses.

Improving the service

In the past opticians' appointments have been given on a first-come-first-served basis. This was fine as long as there were enough appointments available for everyone who needed them but three years ago a large backlog had built up. We increased the number of visits from one or two a year and to a large extent this has been cleared.

I am aware this that FIBS has announced that there are no more appointments available. In fact this is a misunderstanding, as more appointments will be made available nearer the time and I hope there will be no need to postpone any tests until the next visit.

One of the reasons is that we keep some appointments free until all the schoolchildren have been screened. Children at school are screened in years 1, 3, 7 and 10 and those who need it are given a full eye test at KEMH. The screening programme will be done this year by Rachel Hancox, the District Nurse who has trained as an ophthalmic nurse and Miranda Cheek, the Health Visitor. This will allow the opticians an extra day to do eye tests.

The aim is to offer adults a free eye test every three years (every two years if over 60.) Those with specific eye problems (eg glaucoma) and children with glasses will usually be seen more often according to their individual need. We will monitoring the 'reserve list' and particularly whether anyone has to wait until the next visit. We want to provide enough tests to match the demand and if necessary we will ask the opticians to come for longer in the future.

On our side, we would ask that you make every effort to keep your appointment. If there is any reason why you can't, let us know so it can be offered to someone else. Last April a significant number of

people did not keep their appointments.

The appointment system is being computerised and this will improve, speed up and rationalise the appointment system in the future

Laser

Mr Harden will be bringing an ophthalmic laser with him. The main purpose of this is to treat 'posterior capsular opacification' which is a cause of reduced vision in eyes which have had previous cataract surgery. It can also be used in the treatment of certain types of glaucoma.

This type of laser (a YAG laser) is very portable but cannot be used to treat some conditions, eg diabetic eye disease. However if this trial is a success I hope to bring an Argon laser down on future visits for this purpose.

Camp service

In the past the opticians' visits to Camp have been busy and they have not had as much time as they need. The Camp visit will be to Fox Bay this year and we will be asking people to phone in advance for appointments. This will allow us to plan the visit and allow enough time. We will set up one of the rooms at the old Doctor's House in Fox Bay for eye tests. However not all the eye testing equipment at KEMH is portable and some people will still need to come to Stanley for testing.

Screening

Screening means checking healthy people for signs of early disease which may not be causing symptoms. For example we screen for cancer of the cervix by doing smear tests.

Glaucoma (raised pressure in the eye) can cause permanent damage to the vision before a problem is noticed. Testing the pressure in the eye (intro-ocular pressure) is quick and easy and is a part of most eye tests. People should have their intra-ocular pressure checked every three years when they reach the age of 40 and every two years from 60 onwards, but those with a family history of glaucoma may need more regular checks.

I am trying to build up a database of everyone with a family history of glaucoma. If you have a close relative with glaucoma (parents, grandparents, brothers or sisters) it would be helpful if you could let me know so I can make sure you have appropriate checks in the future. Write to me or leave a message at KEMH Reception (27328.) Include your name and date of birth, the name and relationship of affected family members and (if alive) whether they live here or abroad.

Contact lenses

Our opticians do not fit contact lenses, except when they are needed for medical reasons, eg distortion of the cornea (the clear bit of the eye.) The reason is that if serious complications occur there

is not the expertise to deal with them here. There are certain infections which can cause loss of sight if not treated promptly and effectively. However 1 know that a number of people have contact lenses prescribed in the UK and get their supplies from them.

The responsibility for providing lenses and arranging adequate checks remains with the optician who originally prescribed them. However if you do wear lenses prescribed in the UK, our advice is to observe scrupulous hygiene and ideally use daily disposable lenses. If you do not have regular checkups with the prescribing optician, have your eyes checked by our opticians every six months (there will be a charge for this.)

Problems

Inevitably there will be the occasional person who is not satisfied with their glasses, either because the frames or lenses feel wrong. These can usually be resolved by contacting Rachel Berntsen, our receptionist, who will take the details and either return the glasses to the opticians for adjustment, or if it is a problem with the lens type or strength, may refer to me.

It should be realised that refracting (working out the lens strength) is not an exact science and the prescription given by two opies

ticians to the same person may vary slightly. A new pair of glasses will take a few weeks to get used to if the prescription has altered much, and may not feel as good as the old ones to start with.

With reading glasses the strength may vary according to the person's requirements and usual working distance - whether they are used mainly for reading, sewing or other close work. If a genuine error has been made in the prescription, you can ask for a further appointment on the next opticians' visit. On the optician's advice we have purchased some new equipment which will allow more accurate eye testing and prescribing of lenses.

We will be asking everyone who gets glasses to complete a questionnaire about the service, to assess the standard of service and ensure we are meeting people's needs.

Recipes for the Falklands



Greek Style Beans by Elizabeth Villalon

GREEK food is simple and tasty. As a country, eating is a sociable affair, meals are expected to last all evening and fast food restaurants are scarcely known outside of the cities.

Lots of fish and lamb are eaten, often grilled. It's not unusual for the fish to have been landed and cooked within three hours!

This sounds an excellent place to chase up future recipes when you consider the easy access to good quality fish, mutton and lamb we have here.

This recipe is typical of Greek cooking with lots of oregano and tomatoes. Ideally serve this cold with lots of lemon juice to accompany roast or grilled meats.

Ingredients

3 tbsp olive oil 2 chopped onions

4 tsp tomato puree and 175 ml water or the equivalent in tomato

juice 450g green beans 2 tsp oregano ½ tsp garlic

2 tsp salt

1 tsp black pepper

Method:

Heat the oil and fry the onions till soft.
Mix the water and puree and add to the pan.
Add the other ingredients and cook for 15-20 minutes.
Leave the lid off and cook to reduce the liquid.
Cool and add lots of lemon juice to serve.

Councillor Summers continued: "We are committed in the Constitutional review process to ensure that any significant minority opinions are included in the submission to Privy Council. It is important for those members, particularly from the Camp, who are dealing with these issues and are finding pockets of opposition in the Camp.

We have to try to quantify that (opinion), so when we create the report for the Privy Council we can quantify the size of that view.

Ministerial responsibility

Councillor Summers moved on to discuss ministerial authority of councillors. He stated: "I know that some people have a degree of difficulty about this (ministerial responsibility.)

I know they worry about power. However the issue is not about power and it should not be about power. It is about responsibility and accountability

"If you want to run a proper democracy, your representatives must be responsible for what they do otherwise they cannot be held accountable. Those are the key issues: how can the public hold us accountable for what we do if we do not have responsibility? I think we have to move in that direction to improve the quality of our democracy

Constitution role in election

Councillor Summers ended his speech to the Motion for Adjournment by encouraging the continuation of Constitutional consultation though the next election.

He said. "The date of the next election has been brought forward by some considerable period. That shortens the period available to complete a constitutional review before the next election. The programme was already pretty tight. it's now even tighter.

"I did not favour in the first instance trying to complete the constitutional review this side of the election. I think it should cross an election and I would like to see the issue openly debated in public and amongst members because it is important.

"It is important that the public should have the right to express their opinion at the ballot box about what people have to say about constitution.

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

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

Fisheries Dept. contributed to problem say Mila owners

MIKE SUMMERS, director of fishing company Prion Ltd currently facing illegal fishing charges, aimed the bulk of the blame at the Falkland Islands Fisheries Department (FIFD) in court this week.

The case opened on Tuesday morning with Senior Magistrate Keith Watson residing.

Two charges of illegal fishing in the Convention of the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources (CCAMLR) waters were brought against Prion Ltd, owners of the Mila.

The Captain of the *Mila*. Senor Alvarez also appeared to face identical charges. Both Prion Ltd and Sr. Alvarez entered guilty pleas to the charges.

Principal Crown Counsel, Mr Graham Cripps presented the court with a statement of facts including photographs taken by a CCAMLR observer aboard Australian fishing vessel Austral Leader showing the Mila's identification marks, some of which were partly obscured by covers.

Chart plotter wiped

Also included in Mr Cripp's statement was a booklet of printouts from the Mila's chart plotter connected to the vessel's Global Positioning System, providing accurate records of the Mila's movements and position each day. Mr Cripps stated that the log books kept on board by the Mila fishing master had been altered and that the chart plotter had been wiped. The

data was retrieved from the chart plotter by an expert upon the vessel's return to Stanley, clearly showing where the vessel had journeved.

Speaking on behalf of Prion Ltd in court on Tuesday afternoon. Mr Hugh Ferguson stated that the company was clearly responsible under legislation but had been totally unaware of the Mila 's illegal activities.

Principal culprit

He commented that in the company's view the "principal culprit" was the fishing master who misreported to and deceived the company.

He stated that rectification of the illegal activities was further hampered by a twenty-six day delay on the part of the Falkland Islands Fisheries Department in advising Prion Ltd that the Mila's reporting system did not appear to be working which he said, "... takes us into the period during which the vessel was illegally fishing."

He stated that the Fisheries Department had, "...contributed to the difficulties faced by the company."

Company Director Mike Summers then took the witness stand and gave a statement under oath, leaving himself open to cross examination from the prosecution.

Mr Summers began by stating that neither Prion Ltd nor its share-holders condone illegal fishing and that entry by the *Mila* into waters around Heard Island was not permitted by the company.

He commented, "At no time

before September 11 had we any suspicion that the vessel *Mila* was in any area other than that reported by the vessel."

Mr Summers told the court. "The vessel left Cape Town on August 7: to our knowledge all systems were working correctly. However, according to Mr Summers, on August 30 he was advised by the Fisheries Department that they had had no contact by the Mila's Vessel Management System (VMS) for some time. He said. This was effectively four weeks that they had not notified us of this deficiency. Had we been informed earlier we would have ordered it back to port for VMS repairs." He continued, "By this time the vessel was far from any suitable port. making rectification difficult.

Full cooperation

Mr Summers stressed Prion Ltd's full cooperation when the Mila was ordered back to Stanley by the Fisheries Department. He stated, "Had the company less honourable intent, there were numerous opportunities to sail elsewhere during that time, the catch could have been off loaded, equipment changed and the chart plotter altered."

He noted that the chart plotter had provided the bulk of evidence against the company and that it could have been removed but it had been the "motivation of the company" to keep it on board.

Toppling penguins scientific problem?

A STANDING joke about penguins in the Falkland Islands appears to have been taken seriously by the British media.

It has been reported in Britiain that a team of scientists have been sent to the Falklands to investigate whether penguins topple over backwards everytime an aircraft flies overhead.

The story goes that the birds crane their necks so much as they watch the military aircraft roar through the skies that they end up flat on their backs, floundering helplessly unless someone is on hand to pick them up.

It appears, however, that the media have confused this longstanding joke with an actual investigation to be undertaken in South Georgia into penguin stress levels. Scientists are concerned that low flying aircraft noise impacts on the breeding pattern of penguins.

Royal Navy helicopters will fly over a colony at set altitudes and scientists using cameras on the ground will observe the penguins to see what effect, if any, is caused by the flyby.

Contract termination for Beef Specialist

THE Agricultural Department are to terminate the contract of Beef Specialist Jeremy Challacombe it was confirmed yesterday.

Director of Agriculture Bob Reid said the department is currently working on the situation, but added it would be unfair to Mr Challacombe, "...to put the details in the public domain."

He said it was a "...departmental and agricultural matter."

Mr Challacombe has worked for the department for just over twelve months having replaced Mr Robin Thompson.

Seaweed means Spring Point road a priority

WORK on the road from Fox Bay to Port Stephens is to be interrupted to allow for a road to Spring Point to be completed ahead of schedule.

This is necessary in order to allow access to Spring Point for the collection of calcified seaweed. which is vital for pasture improvement, said the Governor in his Executive Council summary speech this week.

The Transport Advisory Committee considered the matter on August 31, and looked at various options for collection of the calcified seaweed, but reached the conclusion that interrupting the Fox Bay - Port Stephens road was the only feasible option.

On the subject of calcified seaweed the Governor said Executive Councillors examined recommendations emerging from the Planning and Building Committee's consideration of the proposal for extraction of the substance at Spring Point.

He said, "Although the Planning and Building Committee had considered that permission should be granted only for a year, to provide safeguards against any environmental damage, Executive Council judged that the nature of the licence which would be granted would provide adequate safeguards in that regard and that time was needed for action to permit access to the deposits. The licence should therefore be for a period of two

Councillors reject film company application

EXECUTIVE Council last week turned down an application by a respected French film company to film Albatross on Beauchene Island. It had been recommended they reject the application by the Environmental Committee.

The Governor said, "Both the Environmental Committee and Executive Council were very happy for the company to film Albatross elsewhere in the Falklands, subject to the permission of landowners where relevant, but believed that access to Beauchene Island should continue to be strictly controlled. with access only for the purposes of scientific research.'

ExCo also rejected, "..on costbenefit grounds, the proposal for a new promotional video of the Falk-land Islands."

Executive Council reports

ExCo discuss GP numbers

THE number of general practitioners required in the Falkland Islands was the subject of discussion at Executive Council last Thursday.

The governor commented that, "The Director of Health and Social Services, Derek Muhl, was invited to join us and we had a very useful and thorough discussion with him about two issues. One was the question of the number of GPs required in the Falkland Islands. Because this affects individuals, it would be wrong for me to announce any outcome or conclusions. We had, however, a very

productive, and wide-ranging discussion.

"We also took advantage of Derek Muhl's presence to discuss a paper submitted by the Chief Medical Officer entitled "Health of the Nation 2000.

"Dr Diggle has prepared a hard-hitting discussion paper, designed to promote public debate and consultation about policy decisions which government might take: inevitably, there are questions of finance and budgetary priorities involved

November date for General Election?

THE next General Election is likely to be held in November 2001 rather than the month of October as is normal

The Governor explained that the Schedule of Meetings for 2001 was discussed at the recent meeting of ExCo. He said, "Given the desirability of avoiding a clash with the Party Conference season in the UK in October, the choice has been either to hold the General Election earlier (but this might mean that a significant number of the electorate could be away from the Islands on holiday) or later, in November.

Councillors will be discussing the question of timing, with the likelihood of suggesting a suitable date in November.

Financial support for FI Overseas Games Association

EXECUTIVE Council last week approved, subject to the agreement of the Standing Finance Committee, financial support for the Falkland Islands Overseas Games Association and the Rifle Association.

also whether there were ways in which members of some sporting

associations or groups could become more involved in developing sporting activities among young people." said the Governor.

He added, "A group was set up some weeks ago to look at sport for youth, and we thought they might like to consider this issue.

Out of court settlement in salvage dispute

AN out of court agreement has been reached between the owners of the Eurofishing longliner Lyn and the Spanish owners of the Argentine registered vessel Vierasa Doce.

The stricken vessel was towed into Stanley by the Lyn following a fire in her forward factory deck last week, served a writ by the Admiralty Marshall and placed under arrest on Saturday October

A dispute arose when the crew and captain of the Lyn claimed salvage rights and the owners of the Vierasa Doce placed a counter

The two sets of owners went on to negotiate in Spain along with the Vierasa Doce's insurance company.

He stated the company had cooperated fully with the authorities, including access to information on the chart plotter by the Fisheries Department which he admitted had been carried out, "...in a matter with which we were not entirely satisfied.

Mr Summers completed his observations saying the company's purpose in reviewing the circumstances had been, "...to show, despite shortcomings by the FIFD, we have cooperated beyond what might be considered normal bounds in this industry.

Yesterday, Prosecutor Graham Cripps cross-examined Mr Summers. Mr Cripps focused on the failure of the Mila's VMS and asked Mr Summers if he had been aware before the letter of August 30 from the FIFD that there were problems with communications with the Mila.

Mr Summers stated he had not been aware of the problem until he received the letter.

He said that all other communications systems were working. ...as well as one would expect from a fishing vessel at long range."

The case is expected to continue for some time.

Off-road parking the solution

I FIRST came to live in Ross Road in 1972 in Jubilee Villa; at that time there were very few vehicles parked in Ross Road.

In 1978 I moved to Ross House. Slowly the amount of traffic increased. This situation continued until 1982 when a sudden influx of Argentine automobiles made the position even worse. After the Conflict, British military transport dominated the scene. Eventually, when the military were based at their quarters at Mount Pleasant, the traffic chaos was somewhat relieved. However, since the proliferation of private businesses, the number of vehicles has risen resulting in a shortage of parking spaces.

May I suggest that a carpark be built in the harbour extending from the Boat House to the Public Jetty. the only limit to its size being the distance extended Northwards. It could be built with Falkland Island stone similar to that used on the East side of the Public Jetty, or perhaps with wooden pylons procured from Chile and incorporate a steel-structure to support, then finally finished with a 'hard-top. For safety reasons, a barrier some three feet high could be added.

by providing off-road parking at their new Capstan Gift Shop. The congestion along Ross Road, particularly the Cathedral area, could also be remedied in a similar fash-

Mine clearance talks in Argentina

DISCUSSIONS on how to clear thousands of Argentine mines planted during the 1982 Falklands invasion have been taking place in Buenos Aires between Argentine and British experts.

As a four-man British Foreign Office and Ministry of Defence delegation arrived in Buenos Aires, the British Government rejected a Buenos Aires newspaper suggestion in La Nacion claiming that the talks are "...unquestionably a big step forward in the bilateral negotiations on the sovereignty of the Islands."

A British Government spokesperson in London told Mercopress that the talks have no implications whatever for the sovereignty disnute.

Delay in tackling the mines problem has resulted not just from the technical difficulty of finding a foolproof method of detecting and removing them, but also from a complication arising from the sovereignty dispute because an international accord on mines clearance, the 1997 Ottawa Treaty, lays the responsibility for removing mines on the country with territorial rights.

This raises the question? Who will carry out the clearance? Will it be a joint effort?

While Britain welcomed a commitment from the previous Menem Government to pay for the clearance of the mines, it rejects any suggestion that this involves any

compromise on the sovereignty claim. The De La Rua Government's official responsible for Falklands affairs. Susana Ruiz Cerruti, is quoted as saying: "Argentina will pay whatever it costs to remove the mines planted by Argentine troops. Removal of British mines will be at British expense."

The cost is estimated at more than 250 million dollars (over 160-million pounds), to remove about 16.000 Argentine mines. The feasibility of clearing the mines was discussed by the British Defence Secretary. Geoff Hoon, during his visit to Argentina in March.

In contrast to fatalities caused by mines in other parts of the world, the Falkland Islands have an excellent safety record in controlling the minefields and protecting the public.

Minefields are cordoned off with barbed wire, and clearly marked with danger signs. Specialist Royal Engineer bomb disposal experts stationed in the Islands keep surveillance, give advice to the public, and lecture schoolchildren on the dangers of explosive devices.

Large tracts of grazing land and some of the best beaches are out of bounds.

Several thousand mines were detected and removed in the immediate aftermath of the conflict, but this work was halted after two mines disposal officers had limbs blown off

New producer for Calling the Falklands

THE new producer of the BBC radio programme "Calling the Falk-lands" is a qualified geologist who has previously worked on oil exploration rigs.

Nikita Gulhane (34), whose parents are from India and settled in Britain about fifty years ago. was born in Wembley. North London. He spoke of his job in an interview for Mercopress and met Mercopress Proprietor, Gus Meikle, in London.

Nikita Gulhane was appointed producer of "Calling the Falklands" a few weeks ago. He previously produced a BBC World Service youth programme, Mega Mix. which has been discontinued. He joined the BBC as a news trainee in 1994 after he was made redundunt as a geologist when the price of oil dropped steeply and the rigs he was working on, off West Africa, failed to find oil. He gained his geology degree at Leeds University and a master's degree in mineral exploration at London's Imperial Col-

He shudders at the thought of returning to the oil industry if offered the opportunity to join Falklands offshore oil exploration. Having worked for a few years in the North Sea," he says, "the prospect of working on an oil platform in the South Atlantic for four weeks at a time looking at samples of rock and mush coming up, does not grab me with pleasure. Spending two hours flying in a helicopter, as I did in the North Sea, from Aber-deen via the Shetlands is not pleasant. After a few years on the rigs, it can become mind-numbingly dull. I enjoy myself incredibly as a reporter, which is a voyeuristic

Learning about the Falkland Islands has been a steep learning curve. He gained his first impressions at school in Harrow, listening to news of the 1982 Conflict. "Coming into this job," he says,

"all I knew about the Falklands was that there had been good signs for oil, they were islands which had good relations with some countries in South America, and what the economy is based on

It came as a complete surprise, that the Argentines invaded South Georgia, when I looked at a map, I thought: 'South Georgia is miles away.' Likewise the Falklands Islands are miles away from Argen-

"It has been interesting learning about the Islands. the justice system, how local government works, and the quirkiness of the arrangements on the Islands. They appear to be exclusive Islands, not insular. It seems a nice arrangement to live there. The Islanders seem to on to a good thing.

Nik Gulhane hopes to visit the Falkland Islands and South Georgia when the military hand over South Georgia to the British Antarctic Survey in February

"I am interested in finding out more about the people of these small outposts of Britain in the Falklands, Ascension and Saint Helena, their hopes and aspirations. I am in touch with the Falkland Islands BroadcastingService where the new manager is trying to make the station more modern.

On Argentina, he says he hopes relations continue to improve on a broader scale, and the Argentines will eventually drop their sover-eignty claim. "I hope that time will allay and draw a veil over people's more patriotic memories. I am sure that if there is oil, it is revenue that could be shared.

As an Indian he is very interested in the Anglo-Pakistan dispute over Kashmir. He has been back to India several times, as a boy and for the BBC, as well as working on assignments in Cuba, Miami. Trinidad and Newcastle.

From oil to journalism No explanation for animal deaths

INCREASED mortalities among cormorants and fish have been a recent cause for concern

According to Cameron Bell. Veterinary Officer at the Department of Agriculture, "Results have been received from samples (of cormorant and fish) sent to Auckland Animal Health Laboratory in New Zealand.

"Microscopicexaminationconfirmed the diagnosis of parasitic infestation in the proventriculus (stomach) of the cormorants although this was not necessarily the cause of death.

"Other changes noted suggested that probable starvation/protein loss had occurred due to the parasite infection

'Similarly, changes in the mullet were also suggestive of anorexia/ diminished feed intake prior to death. The cause of this however, was not diagnosed."

No new mortalities of cormorants or mullet have been recorded since the initial deaths approximately one month ago.

According to Mr Bell, "This suggests the cause of death or conditions leading to the deaths have abated or are present no longer. The observation of mortalities across the Falkland Islands would suggest that a localised poisoning such as farm chemicals would be unlikely."

"A possible explanation of widespread mortalities could be an algal bloom. Toxins produced by marine algae can act very quickly with clinical signs becoming apparent in animals within 15 minutes of exposure.

"Laboratory examination for the presence of toxic algae is required for diagnosis but samples must be collected from animals within two days of exposure.

"Unfortunately very fresh specimens were not obtained and hence algal poisoning cannot be confirmed."

Mr Bell concluded saying, "No final diagnosis was reached. It appears that the cause(s) of the mortalities had a large spatial distribution but occurred over a relatively short period of time.

A week in the shadow of Ebola

The following account was written by Nola Henry, a former staff nurse at the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital.

Nola is now nursing in Uganda.

TO pick up the local paper on Sunday and find them announcing that the Ebola virus is in Uganda is not the normal local headline.

"Panga attack couple burnt to death" is the usual ghastly local offering, but Ebola, this is something else all together. As if these poor people of northern Uganda haven't had more than enough to cope with over the last few years.

They are a sort of "forgotten" people. They have been caught in the middle of rebel activity between the Sudan. Congo and Uganda, but because there has been no "major genocide" reference along the lines of Rwanda or no strange religious sect, whacko murder/suicides etc. it is all too easily ignored.

This part of Uganda is different in both climate and scenery from the rest of the country, a lot of it being semi-desert, and much hotter than here.

There is already a drought in the region, and so many are facing a food shortage.

Tuesday

Reports of how bad this whole Ebola thing is, are scratchy. There is not yet reported to be restrictions on people entering and leaving the area, although one has to wonder why not, as it has spread out of Gulu, (described in the guide book as "a dry and airless town". [not too sure what an airless town would be like]) and into the neighbouring district immediately to the west.

The United Nations and World Health do have a contingency plan to help the health agencies in the area. Other agencies, not directly involved in health but who have been working with the refugees in the area are taking some of their staff out of the area until the situation is clearer.

I was rather amazed when Dr Anne got up at the end of the morning prayer session today to announce the "Kiwoko contingency plan" should anyone be brought in here showing signs of the disease.

I had two initial thoughts: (a) my God, do they really think it might come down here, and (b) we actually have a contingency plan—impressive.

As far as the first point goes, it has not come south of Gulu, which is at least a five hour drive north of here, and for the second point, the contingency plan consists of, ..., put them straight into the empty

ward, and leave them, as there is nothing we can do for them."

Wouldn't it be great to be able to write that into a "disaster plan" at home: "It is all too much to think about, so lets ignore it".

The matron of the hospital, who is a lady who spends a lot of time asking everyone."...if we are together." in some sort of hiblical reference, believes that the virus has been brought to bear as a result of the sins of Uganda, and so everyone must pray and repent and all will be well.

You can see by this, that the nurses do not really expect much practical help or reassurance, or altogether any constructive assistance at all from her in this crisis or any day to day event for that matter

Suddenly, that section of the health books that people read only when they wanted to reassure themselves that perhaps malaria was not the worst thing you could get, is being perused with more attention. Five people have seemingly recovered, but the odds are around 90% against recovery pretty terrible odds.

The incubation period is believed to be 5-7 days, and then the manifestations can be swift, and people are dying within 1-2 days It seems that merely touching or being touched by any body fluid is enough to contract the disease, and since the major symptom is haemorrage (and dissolving organs), it is pretty hard for people caring for their sick relatives or bringing them to medical aid to avoid contact with the blood.

The local paper reported how one lady became infected by using a blanket that had been used to cover the body of her relative, and went on to say. (word for word) "...unfortunately now that blanket will have to be burnt" (!) The paper goes on to say that the disease, "...can be easily contained and for people not too panic, simply burn or bury any bodies immediately that you suspect they have been infected with Ebola, and avoid contact with any wild monkeys, bats, rats or mice." (What, we ask, of tame monkeys, bats, rats and mice?)

Much to my amazement (it is my week to be amazed. I know) Garry, our building engineer, who had planned a trip to this very area, did not postpone it, and went off yesterday morning. He said that the reports are probably exaggerated. How can you exaggerate the fact that people are contracting ebola?

Truly, living in Africa must do something to people's heads after a while. They seem to think that working for a church hospital somehow gives them divine protection.

He rang the hospital today to say that they are "still well." Everyone is saying it is good he has gone up there as we will know first hand how bad it is: I just think they are all mad.

Wednesday

It is all becoming somewhat more worrying.

Moving out of the realms of being a rather good story to be told when you get home, along the lines of, "Oh yes, I was in Uganda when the Ebola outbreak was on," to something that no-one is too sure about.

The news today is that it has spread East and South. The good news from our point of view is that it has come East first and then South, so is heading toward Jinja rather than Luwero

Luwero and Jinja are separated by a series of lakes, and fairly sparsely populated. We haven't heard of anything in the Mesindi region which is the one directly to the north of us and below Gulu

It is difficult to know if the cases outside of Gulu are truly Libola or not, as a lot of the early signs are signs of very common diseases here.

Diagnosis is being based on symptoms alone at this stage. People are beginning to panic at the onset of high fever, chest pain and cough, which could be any number of things. The "cases" reported in the areas other than Gulu have not showed the hideous manifestations of the body's organs dissolving and haemorraging.

The Americans have flown in specialists from the Disease Control Centre in Atlanta, and the Government of Uganda seems to be reacting as quickly as they could have reasonably been expected to react. The rebels unfortunately have not declared a truce, and reportedly have intensified their attacks and abductions, so official people are being ferried about in army convoys.

The general public of Uganda are beginning to take notice and question why there are no restrictions on people entering and leaving affected areas. Uganda really does have fairly efficient public transport and lots of people also have access to private vehicles so people can move large distances in a day.

People outside of Uganda are probably receiving more accurate and up to date reports than ourselves.

Thursday

People are, not surprisingly, I suppose, beginning to imagine that everyone who comes into the hospital here with any kind of bleeding has Ebola.

To date there are 96 confirmed cases of which 42 have died, all but a few of them in the Gulu region. The worry of yesterday that it had

come South toward Jinja has not been confirmed.

People have changed their minds about the sense of Garry and Christine (one of the nurses who has relatives up in the Gulu area) being up there now! They are due back tomorrow: do you think we could put them in quarantine for a week or so?

Friday

No reported spread today and at least now people are being prevented from entering or leaving the areas where the cases are definitely confirmed.

Our contingency plan has developed a little further to include accessing disposable gowns, aprons, masks and gloves etc from a special government depot, but only to be issued if in fact we get a confirmed case!

Garry and Christine are back and seemingly well, they certainly did not have any contact with any ill people so that is something. They say that things are quite well organised up there, with the United Nations (UN) and World Health Organisation (WHO) people taking control.

All people visiting the food markets are being issued with gloves before handling any food which I thought was pretty forward thinking. They have proper control of all the burials now, or preferably cremations, but local customs prefer to bury the dead.

What do you think being buried does to the virus? Does it stay active in the ground?

Except for those directly affected. Ebola is not the biggest problem up there for the locals. Can you imagine that? Life is so grim that the emergence of one of the deadliest diseases in the world does not rate as the worst thing happening in your life?

The rebels have got completely out of hand and murdered an expat Catholic priest who had lived up there for 40 years and kidnapped a bus load of children he was taking somewhere and sold them as slaves into the Congo. It is all very tragic.

So, there seems every reason to be hopeful that Ebola will soon be under complete control, and everyone involved will have done well to contain it to a couple of regions.

This week has made me realise that this is the "real Africa", this day to day struggle just to survive, this battle with disease and war.

The "real Africa" that western tourists speak of and seek out, that of game parks and animals, waterfalls and beautiful scenery, that is a luxury that only those from outside can appreciate and enjoy. For those who live here, whose true home it is, there is no luxury just, if they are lucky, a chance to live another day.

TOOTHFISH POACHERS NETWORK

AS the international Convention for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources, CCAMLR. began its annual convention in Hobart. Tasmania, on 23 October, conservation groups said that US consumers are still unwittingly purchasing illegally caught too this. a species managed largely by CCAMLR.

According to the Antarctic and Southern Ocean Coalition, ASOC, an organisation representing some 250 conservation groups worldwide. Canada's refusal to implement the CCAMLR's Catch Documentation Scheme (CDS) has allowed undocumented toothfish imported mainly from Chile to be illegally re-imported into the US.

The ASOC is calling for urgent measuresto stopillegal, unreported, and unregulated (IUU) fishing that they say. "is still at levels high enough to drive toothfish stocks to commercial extinction," despite the successof the Catch Documentation Scheme.

"The time has come to institute a moratoriumon fishing for toothfish in the Southern Ocean, and to close the markets of the world to toothfish for as long as it takes for governments to fix the IUU fishing problem." said Dr. Alan Hemmings an ASOC representative.

CCAMLR instituted its Catch Documentation Scheme in May of this year, which requires that paperwork accompany toothfish imports into all CCAMLR member nations. The papers demonstrate the fish were caught by vessels operating under the provision of CCAMLR and within a member nation quota. The United States and Japan, both CCAMLR nations, represent the largest markets for toothfishand the anticipated closing of those markets was expected to suppress illegal fishing.

One industry estimate suggests that 30,000 metric tonnes of toothfish is still poached annually, based on a known number of pirate vessels operating in the Southern Oceanand per-tripharvestaverages. The legal catch of toothfish in Southern Ocean waters regulated by CCAMLR is expected to be 10-12,000 metric tonnes, with additional catches of 10-12,000 metrictons in the exclusive economic zones of Argentina, Chile, and South Africa.

The ASOC accuses Spanish vessels of being, "responsible for the bulk of the IUU fishing in the Southern Ocean." In addition, the organisation specifically charges Uruguay with permitting illegal toothfish to enter Montevideo Port, Chile with failing to shut down factories that process illegal

toothfish, and Japan with allowing the import of fish and fish products from IUU fishing operations. Illegal toothfish is readily marketed in China, which has not signed up to the CCAMLR convention. The ASOC contends, and industry sources confirm, that China substantial processing facilities reexport poached toothfish to Japan and other nations.

While toothfish pirate vessels have been banned from most port in the Southern Ocean, Port Louis in Mauritius has become, "the number one port for toothfish poachers active in the Indian Ocean sector of the Southern Ocean." Mauritius, with sugar and textile trade ties to the US. has so far resisted diplomatic efforts to get it to turn pirate vessels away from its port facilities. especially modernized to serve the illegal toothfish fleet. Though toothfish poachers find a haven in Mauritius, they are occasionally apprehended shing in the exclusive economic zones of countries with island possessions in the Southern Ocean, France, for example, patrols its waters around Reunion and the Crozet Islands, and has in the past seized foreign pirate vessels, auctioned off the catch, and sunk

Besides contributing to over fishing, toothfish poachers accidentally hook and drown endangered albatross and petrels. The level of illegal fishing may. "drive some seabirds populations to actual extinction." says the ASOC. (FIS/MP)

CHILEANLEADSWORLD FISHING UNION

THE president of Chile's National Confederation of Artisan Fishermen. Conapach, Humberto Mella Ahumada, has been elected co-president of the World Fisheries Forum for fishermen and others who work in the industry, together with Danielle Le Souze, who represents French fishermen.

Mella dives for shellfish and writes poetry and has managed Conapach for several years representing more than 42,000 artisan fishermen from Chile, who are mainly selfemployed and operate in coastal waters.

After three years in operation, the fishermen forum established its bill of principals guided to confirm the importance of artisan fishermen in contemporary society and a globalisedworld. With this objective in mind, representatives of different fishermen organizations from around the world will meet in Brittany, France, to hold the first world fisheries forum of this century. More than 300 delegates from 32 countries will take part.

In Chile, the world's third most

important fishing nation, artisan (coastal) fishermen account for 12% of total landings, and supply almost 90% of marine products consumed in Chile.

NEW SAGA-NEW PATIENTS

THE Royal Navy doctor whose medical team saved many lives, both British and Argentine, in the 1982 Falklands Conflict, is back at sea in very different circumstances.

Rick Jolly now works as a ship's doctor both on the Saga Rose and on the scheduled passenger-cargo ship RMS Saint Helena. operated by Curnow Shipping of Cardiff, between Britain, South Africa, Ascension Island and Saint Helena.

In 1982. Dr Jolly, a young Royal Navy Surgeon Commander, led a medical team which gave emergency treatment to 250 wounded men in their front-linecasualty station at Ajax Bay. Not a single British serviceman died while in their care. Among the wounded were 78 Argentines, as well as badly burned Welsh Guardsmen from the landing vessel Sir Galahad.

Dr Jolly was uniquely awarded two medals, the OBE, and its Argentine equivalent, the Order of May, which he accepted as recognition of his whole team's humanitarian work.

Dr Jolly has told this remarkable story of survival and medical expertise in his book *The Red and Green Life Machine* (Century Publishing), and recounts his war experiences in a more light-hearted lecture entitled "A 16-thousand Mile Cruise — and the Shore Excursion!", on *Saga Rose*.

One of the liner's two captains, Martin Reed, was formerly Chief Officer of the 1982 Task Force troopship Canberra.

Dr Jolly has also been compiling a unique "Garden of Remembrance" website for the Falklands veterans' organisation, the South Atlantic Medal Association, known as SAMA '82, commemorating all 255 British servicemen and the civilians killed in the conflict, with their photographs, a description of their lives and how they died. HB

OUTSTANDING FIELD COMMANDER: MILITARY HISTORIAN

MAJOR General Julian Thompson, CB,OBE, was indisputably the outstanding land campaign commander in 1982.

He master-minded a series of hard-fought battles and triumphed against all the odds, as he describes in his book, No Pienie (Secker and Warburg). In a long military career, the Falklands was his biggest challenge and finest hour.

With retirement from the forces, he has channelled his energies and expertise into new careers. He is a defence industry consultant, a security and safety adviser on oil and minerals exploration, and a military historian, as a Visiting War Studies Professor, television commentator and author.

When Saga Rose calls in at Buenos Aires, General Thompson and Dr Jolly plan a reunion with some of their former Argentine adversaries. **HB**

"THE WORLD'S BEST PRESS SECRETARY"

THAT'S how Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher described Bemard Ingham during his eleven years as her Chief Press Secretary when she dominated British politics and travelled the world meeting other leaders.

Always she was accompanied by this bluff Yorkshireman as one of her closest, most trusted advisers, witnessing at first hand her triumphs and her setbacks.

This will be his first time back in the Falklands since he master-minded and somehow kept secret for her security Prime Minister Thatcher's clandestine trip to receive the Freedom of the Falkland Islands in the dangerous aftermath of the Conflict, in which he was instrumental in allowing journalists to accompany the Task Force.

Sir Bernard is re-visiting Argentina, Uruguay and Chile for the first time since he went on a commercial proving flight 36 years ago in the VC Ten, an aircraft on which he was later to travel more than half a million miles with Margaret Thatcher with RAF Strike Command. He tells his fascinating story at the centre of political power in his lectures and his very readable book, Kill the Messenger (HarperCollins).HB

NEW MAYOR FOR PUNTA ARENAS JUAN MORANO from the Christian

Democrat party, junior member of the Chilean ruling coalition Concertación, became Punta Arena's new Mayor after beating last Sunday's municipal elections, both the opposition and Socialist candidates

Mr. Morano's victory with almost 40% of votes cast, is particularly sweet since polls as well as political analysts favored the Concertación privileged candidate. Mr. Carlos González Jaksic from the Socialist party

Actually Mr. González Jaksic only managed 17% of the vote, behind runner up Mr. Oscar Bravo from the Conservative opposition with 22%.

However this means that Punta Arenas Legislative City Council will be ruled by a clear majority from the national ruling coalition that includes Christian Democrats and Socialists.

Socialists were quite baffled by the results since Punta Arenas traditionally has been considered a Socialist stronghold.

In the rest of Magallanes Region with the exception of Porvenir and Navarino, most other communities re-elected their mayors. Puerto Natales, Torres del Paine, Timaukel, Primavera, Rio Verde, San Gregorio and Laguna Blanca. This means an almost even split between the ruling coalition and the Conservative opposition.

Mr. Morano will rule for the next

four years

CRUISE SEASON BEGINS

NEXT November 13th, with the arrival of "Switzerland" officially begins the cruise season in Montevideo. which this year includes 24 great ships, 66 schedules in Montevideo and Punta del Este and over 50,000 visitors.

With this in mind local port and tourist officials together with the private organisation SurCruise Association are planning a celebration in the main square of the old City to welcome the first visitors of the coming season. This is expected to become an annual event

According to Uruguayan authorities the cruise industry, one of the fastest growing in the world (8% per annually), recorded eight million passengers last season of which "only 30,000 stopped in Montevideo", and we're determined that number, and percentage keeps growing," said Emilio Cazalá an expert in maritime and tourism affairs.

Among the vessels expected in Among the vessels expected in the coming months are the 69,000 tons "Splendor of the Seas"; "Mercury" with 76,200 tons displacement, "Saga Rose", "Silver Shadow", "Costa Allegra", "Costa Marina" and "Marco Polo".

TOOTHFISH PIRACY NETWORK.

Punta Arenas press revealed this week details of the "Chilean chapter" of the toothfish piracy network that operates worldwide.

According to "La Prensa", the list of vessels caught poaching dur-

ing the last four years in the Indian Ocean by the French Navy operating from the Kerguelen and Reunion Islands, includes the "Antonio Lorenzo", belonging to Concar; "Ercilla" from Los Andes Fisheries: "Mar del Sur I" and "Mar del Sur II": and the Spanish flagged "Amur" that ended in tragedy with the loss and several disappearance of crewmembers, some of them from Punta Arenas. One of the most recent poaching actions involved the Argentine flagged "Vierirasa XII". belonging to the Spanish company Concar.

Mr. Jorge Cofré, from the Officers and Crewmembers Union, Punta Arenas chapter, claims that Spanish companies are involved in the illegal trade together with Chilean partners, particularly a Mr. Roberto Verdugo. a former Fisheries Secretary during the Pinochet regime and owner of the notorious now extinct Mar del Sur company:

Mr. Cofré also revealed that during the tragic sinking of the "Amur". the vessels that helped rescue crewmembersoperated without lights and a radio and communications blackout since they feared French

Navy pauols. The French are particularly severe with poachers, fines are huge and if owners don't claim arrested vessels, they simply sink them, that's why they fear them so much," emphasized Mr. Cofré

BAT UNDER INVESTIGATION. THE British Government has began an investigation into the dealings of British American Tobacco, particularly in Argentina, Brazil and Paraguay, following claims that the company allegedly was involved in tax evasion.cigarettesmugglingandpromoting smoking.

According to a Parliamentary report BAT was even involved with professional smugglers and organized crime to promote the introduction of cigarettes into different South American countries, under the code name of DNP ("duty no paid")

The report names current and former top officials of BAT Co. Industries involving BAT subsidiaries in Argentina, Nobleza Piccardo and in Brazil, Souza Cruz, plus transcripts of 1992 and 1994 internal communications mentioning DNP as means to penetrate and increase market shares in Argentina and Brazil.

One of the alleged procedures was to legally import a small batch of cigarettes, followed with a strong marketing campaign, and then continue the main supply with DNP inflows from Paraguay.

BAT officials in Argentina and Brazil have categorically denied the allegations and former Tory Minister Kenneth Clarke, current vicepresident, said quotes in company letter and messages were taken out of context, adding this is an "exaggerated witch hunt.

One of the informers who helped with leads for the report is a repentant cigarette smuggler by the name of Lee Thompson.

LADIES TURN.

FOR the first time since it was created in 1912 the Argentine Air Force is now completely open to women. That means that in five years time, lady pilots could be flying advanced training combat aircraft such as the Pampa, and advancing to the highest posts of the Service

The Military Air School has decided that 33 out of the 100 annual vacancies will be reserved for young

woman aspirants.

The opening, considered historic. has had a similar reply, over 300 young candidates have requested registration conditions.

Normally 800 to 1000 candidates turn up in February for the very rigorous admission exams.

"MAD POTATO CONFLICT"

A combined British-Argentine Air Forces exercise cancelled, and an embargo of Crown assets in the Falklands are some of the immediate consequences of a long standing damages litigation by Argentine potato farmers against the British government involving a 250 million US dollars demand.

It all started back in 1980 when farmers from Balcarce purchased potato seeds guaranteed by the British Potato Marketing Board that turned out to be contaminated with a dangerous virus for human beings.

A British expert confirmed the contamination and on this evidence the case was started in a local Argentine court. The 1982 conflict interrupted proceedings but now, twenty years later Judge José Tresguerras sentenced an embargo on Crown as-sets equivalent to 171 million US dollars plus 80 million US dollars interest and prosecution costs, and ordered Foreign Minister Rodriguez Giavarini to carry out the sentence in accordance with international law

Among assets detailed in the sentence, according to the Argentine press, are the "Crown's shares in the Falkland Islands Company

An immediate fallout of the sentence was the canceling of the RAF. AWAC flight to Argentina to par-ticipate this week with Argentine Air Force fighters in combat exercises.

CHILEAN COALITION STANDS STRONG

IN spite of loosing Santiago and Concepción, the Chilean ruling coalition overall managed to recover from last January's second presidential round, and managed a comfortable lead of twelve points over the Conservative opposition in last Sunday's municipal elections.

But there were also setbacks: in Santiago, former opposition coalition presidential candidate Joaquin Lavin, defeated former first lady, Mrs. Marta Frei by an ample margin, recovering Chile's capital for the Conservatives for the first time since Pinochet left government. Concepción in the mid south, and an important left stronghold also fell for the Conservative "Union for Chile".

According to the seven million votes cast, the ruling coalition of Socialist president Ricardo Lago obtained 52%, while the opposition 40%. However of a total 341 mayor posts at stake, the ruling coalition dropped from 205 to 168 and the Union for Chile added another forty.

The apparent contradiction is a

consequence of the current electoral legislation, from Pinochet's time, that privileges winning candidates as long as they manage the 30% benchmark. The right wing opposition presented an only candidate in most races, while the ruling coalition in many instances, split between leading partners. Socialist and Christian Democrat candidates.

SAO PAULO: RED OR PINK? A 55 YEAR old feminist. psychologist, former sex counselor and television star was elected mayor of South America's main city and financial and industrial heart of the

Brazilian economy, Sao Paulo.
Marta Suplicy, from one of the cities traditional families, and running as a Socialist candidate defeated a former Conservative Mayor 58 to 41%, and for the next four years will have to manage a city of twelve million residents and attempt to balance a four billion US dollar municipal

budget.
It's not the first time a left wing candidate wins in Sao Paulo, but ac cording to political analysts. Ms Suplicy is a more mature and responsible" version of the Workers Party that was born two decades ago from the auto workers unions in the industrial belt of the city with a strong radical, militant heart to it under the leadership of "Lula" da Silva who has ran twice for the Brazilian presi-

"Rather pinkish, given the character and background of the lady", said Elio Jaguaribe a renowned analyst, "but with a very strong hold in Brasilia, which should not be ignored since Brazil will be holding presidential elections in 2002'

However of the eleven major cities in disputes, five went to the Socialist Workers Party, including Porto Alegre, the capital of Rio Grande do Sul the most southern Brazilian state next to Uruguay

Rio do Janeiro on the other hand. which usually is to the left, and is considered the cultural and creative capital of the country, voted for a Conservative candidate.

URUGUAY SHOOTS 15,000 LIVESTOCK

A TOTAL of 15,000 livestock, 12,000 cattle, 2,00 sheep and 500 hogs-will have been eliminated with "sanitary" rifles, and buried, by this weekend in the extreme northwest of Uruguay, where a foot and mouth outbreak was reported, and confirmed, a week ago.

Artigas, which is the name of the county, next to the Brazilian border. has been completely isolated from the rest of the country by land and water, and food supplies are being flown in for the families of those farmers in the immediate area of the outbreak who have lost all their cattle and means of life.

The government is paying out the equivalent of 1.2 million US dollars for the livestock eliminated, but this does not necessarily help farmers who have been deprived of their dairy cattle or calves to rebuild herds.

Given the quick and strict action taken by Uruguayanauthorities, Brazil, Chile and the United States who had cancelled beef purchases, have anticipated they will continue to trade in a few weeks times.

"It's a tragedy for the country, worse than the oil crisis or the droughts and floods we've experi-

Since the collapse of wool prices a decade ago, Uruguay has invested heavily in promoting beef, dairy products and forestry as alternatives. The country had been declared free of foot and mouth disease four years ago and this comes as a terrible blow for the main export of the country

Although no cattle was actually found to have the disease, blood samples indicated they had been in contact with the 0 virus, the same that a month ago was reported in the south of Brazil, and previously in Argentina and Paraguay.

It is believed smuggled hogs, or hog feed are to blame for the spread of the disease, since a mother and suckling pigs were the animals first reported with foot and mouth disease in a farm a few meters away from the border.

Anyhow, in spite of the Army, Customs and Sanitary pickets on both sides of the Uruguayan Brazilian border, to eliminate the disease is a challenge since it's practically an open border and residents shop whereever it is cheaper, and supplies are even delivered at home, either side

ARGENTINE FISHERMEN WANT SPANIARDS OUT

DURING a recent meeting with representatives from Spanish fisheries, Ricardo Angelis. Argentine spokesmen for the fresh fish vessels based in Mar del Plata. asked for the expulsion of Galician freezer vessels from Argentine waters, reports La Voz de Galicia.

We demand the withdrawal of the freezer fleet from Argentina's Exclusive Economic Zone, "emphasized Mr. Angelis during the meeting held in Madrid last October 25th, Galician fishing interests hold almost 90% of the freezer fleet operating in Argentina, and investments in "Argentina's fisheries, mainly hake, reached 400 million US dollars during the

last few years, generating 3,600 direct jobs and 15,000 indirectly", argue the Spaniards.

During his recent visit to Spain, Argentine President Fernando De la Rúa was asked by Galician businessmen from Santiago de Compostela to fully implement the Federal Fisheries Law approved in January 1998, which would ensure a catch quota for the freezer fleet.

Galician businessmen also requested "equal treatment" for the fresh fish and freezer vessels, and called for the establishment of a 30-mile corridor to catch squid. Additionally they asked authorization to fish for common hake south of parallel 48, until the Total Allowable Catch (TAC) is completed.

Fisheries have a promising future in Argentina as long as "legal certainty" is ensured". underlined representatives from the Galician fishing fleet. Spanish ship owners also indicated that their vessels had respected the 120,000-tonne hake quota, and insisted in the need to establish 'a stable, reliable legal framework to enable Spanish invest-ments to keep growing". "Having banned our fleet from hake fishing grounds has meant a loss of several hundred million dollars during the last 18 months" indicated Spanish representatives. Since the Federal Fisheries Law was passed in Argentina in 1998, followed by 44 regulations, operating conditions for the Galician-owned fleet in Argentine waters have become more and more steep. Hake ban has meant that Spanish vessels currently fishing south of paral-lel 48, must catch other species to barely break even.



WOOL REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING OCTOBER 27

In Australia the Eastern Market Indicator (EMI) lost two cents on Tuesday, dropped another three cents on Wednesday and recovered the three cents on Thursday, to close the week down two at 740 A cents per kg. With fine wool still generally leading, the EMI level of 740 is two cents off the high point of the season to date in Australian dollar terms. In South Africa the Cape Wool Merino Indicator lifted 0.4 percent to end at 2125 SA cents/kg clean.

In New Zealand the Fine Indicator lost 45 cents to 1665 NZ cents, the Medium Indicator gained a cent to 570 NZ cents whilst the Strong Indicator dropped 18 cents to 436 NZ cents.

Currencies & Interest Rates

At time of writing the Australian dollar was trading at 2.77 A\$/£ whilst the New Zealand dollar was at 3.61 NZ\$/£. These currency levels continue to negate part of the recent increases in the Australian wool market, when trading is in the relatively strong sterling currency. On Thursday the euro fell to a new low, for the second consecutive day, against the U\$ dollar of \$0.8229. At this week's meeting of G20 finance ministers in Montreal, "there had been speculation that Australia and South Africa - whose currencies have fallen in tandem with the euro might add to pressure on Larry Summers, the US Treasury Secretary to temper his support for the strong dollar". FT

Final payments to all Farm Principals for the 1999/2000 season wool clip were concluded on or before Friday of last week (20/10/00). The 1999/2000 season has thus been concluded about two months earlier than last year, illustrating that despite the low wool prices so drastically influenced by market and currency factors. Falkland Wool Growers Ltd have an excellent customer base for speciality Falkland wool. Enquires continue and we are seeking additional volumes of wool for 2000/2001 to satisfy demand



REPEATED exposure to too much sun over a number of years can cause damage to skin.

This includes early ageing and wrinkling (something that many women aren't aware of), brown spots, roughened 'crusty' spots and skin cancers.

It is not just people who sunbathe who are at risk. Outdoor workers who do not cover their skin are more prone to these problems.

There are two main types of damaging ultraviolet sunlight, UVA and UVB. UVA has the effect of ageing the skin and causing wrinkles and other damage to deeper layers of skin UVB causes sun tanning but also burning. It can also cause other damage to the skin. In some people, too much UVB may cause skin cancer.

All people are at risk if exposed to too much sun. People with fair skin, freckles, red or ginger hair are most at risk. In general, the darker the skin, the less risk of developing skin cancer.

Preventing sun damage:

Stay out of the sun as much as possible. In particular, do not sunbathe between 10am and 2pm when the sunrays are strongest.


We obviously don't do much sunbathing as such here, but remember this when you're next delayed in Ascension Island or on holiday on a tropical beach.

People forget that you can get sunburnt whilst swimming, especially snorkelling.

Use a waterproof sunscreen or. better still, a tee shirt. This is especially important for children.

- When out, wear wide brimmed hats to protect the face and neck. These are the areas most commonly affect by skin cancers due to too much sunlight.
- Cover up the body as much as possible. Wear long sleeve tops and baggy shorts.
- Children's skin is more sensitive than adults. They should keep their clothes on if playing in the sun for significant periods. All exposed areas of the body should have sunscreen applied. Wide brimmed hats with a neck protector are recommended.
- Sunscreens should be applied to all exposed areas of skin. Renew it regularly.

Sunscreens are labelled with a sun protection factor (SPF). A factor of 15 or more is recommended for average use but if in the tropics, eg Ascension Island, use Fac-



Most work by absorbing ultraviolet rays but some reflect the rays. Sunscreens that protect against both UVA and UVB are the best. Sunscreens should be used to help protect against sunlight, not as a substitute for avoiding expo-

If swimming use a waterproof sunscreen and renew it after coming out of the water

- Some SUNTANNING LO-TIONS DO NOT contain sunscreen and will provide NO protection.
- Beware of reflected light. On sunny days, even in the shade, a hot sun can burn if reflected from sand etc. Sunlight can also come through thin cloud and thin clothes.
- The suns rays are more powerful at higher altitudes. Beware of this. It may be cooler but you will need more protection.
- Wear sunglasses as exposure to prolonged sunlight can also damage the eyes.

But be sure that the sunglasses have an UV filter coating otherwise you may actually make things

Remember - SLIP. SLAP. SLOP. Slip on some clothes. Slap on a hat. Slop on sunscreen.

Despite all this doom and gloom, sunlight is also good for you, in moderation, and if using the above precautions.

The main thing is not to underestimate the power of the sun, especially here in the Falklands where the wind stops you feeling hot but doesn't stop you burning.

I worked for 3 years in the Middle East before coming here, a place where the temperatures were often in the 50's (Centigrade not Fahrenheit!)

Despite this, the worst sunburn I have ever seen is here in the Falklands.

Be sensible and enjoy the summer!

Recipes for the Falklands



Citrus Pie by Elizabeth Villalon

THE coming summer can be portrayed by the colour yellow. It makes you think of light, freshness and all things clean. It brings to mind sunshine, daffodils and lemons.

Hot holiday destinations seem to abound with lemon trees where the fruit is practically given away or served up disguised as starter, salad, savoury and sweet - luxury! How about the wondrous vision of roads lined with shady orange trees? Paradise! It wasn't till the grand old age of 21 that I realised the trees had long thorns too. Reality!

This zingy fruit pie is easy and slightly different.

Ingredients

I large grapefruit 4 oranges Rind and juice of 1/2 lemon 3 tbsp polenta/semolina/minute tapioca Pinch of salt 8oz granulated sugar Ilb flour 4oz margarine 4 oz lard

Method

Chop up the grapefruit and oranges into small pieces. Mix the fruit with the lemon, polenta, salt and sugar. Allow to stand for a few minutes.

Meanwhile make up the pastry using the flour, margarine and lard. Line a deep pie dish with pastry. Add the fruit mixture, which should have plenty of juice. Top with the rest of the pastry. Bake in the usual way. Serve hot or cold.

The 2001 Island Games

A QUESTION which regularly arises as the build-up to an Island Games commences and clubs start preparing their competitors, is that of eligibility.

The eligibility regulations pertaining to the Island Games differ somewhat to those of the Commonwealth Games.

Looking at the Island Games first of all - a person born in the Falklands will always be permitted to represent the Islands regardless of where they reside. A good example of this criteria can be outlined in the case of Saul Pitaluga, a native Islander and staunch supporter, who currently lives and works in England. Not so long ago someone surprisingly questioned his right to represent the Falklands, not realising that as a native Islander he will always have the right to compete for the Falklands in both Island and Commonwealth Games. Saul in fact spends a considerable amount of time and his own money in practising and competing in clay pigeon shooting events in Britain, so maintaining a good standard.

The question of the eligibility of persons who are currently living in the Falklands is a little more com-

The Island Games Association (IGA) under whose auspices the Games are organized, have a published Constitution which states that a person who has resided on an island for the full 12 months prior to

the closing date for entries for an Island Games, may compete for that Island. (The closing date is 2 months before the Opening Ceremony).

Recently an article in a Guernsey newspaper, which highlighted the fact that the Falklands will for the first time, send a football team to an Island Games, suggested that local team manager/coach Lec Mitchell might well include several British Servicemen in his selection. The journalist pointed out that provided the Servicemen met the 12 months residential qualification there could be no opposition to their selection.

In fact Lee Mitchell has already indicated that he has no intention of selecting British Servicemen and will stick with lads who are playing in the local league, while possibly including a few youngsters like Daniel Biggs who are attending colleges in Britain.

In previous Games, Gibraltar has included British Servicemen who were stationed on the 'rock' for 12 months or more, in their football team, and constitutionally have the right to do so.

The recent announcement by Governor Donald Lamont that Councillors will once again financially support the Falklands squad who will attend next year's Island Games, has been welcomed by all sportsmen and women in the Islands. However this quite understandably does not mean 100% of fares for all,

Mila fined and disqualified

FISHING company Prion Limited received a fine of £140.000 in court on Monday having pleaded guilty to two charges of illegal fishing in CCAMLR waters.

The company was disqualified for two years from holding a CCAMLR licence and all but 29 3 tonnes of its 120 tonne catch, consisting mainly of Toothfish, was forfeited by the crown for disposal. Ninety tonnes of toothfish is worth approximately \$700,000.

The captain of the vessel. Snr Manuel Alvarez Gayo, was fined £5.000. He also pleaded guilty to two oftences of having used the Mila for fishing in CCAMLR waters (in the Australian fishing zone) without the authority of a CCAMLR fishing licence

Senior Magistrate Keith Watson imposed the penalties after summing up the facts of the case in a statement on Monday. The case began after the Mila was ordered to Stanley by the Fisheries Department.

Mila was accused of fishing illegally in Australian waters having been spotted near Heard Island by a licensed vessel on September 10

During his statement to the court Mr Watson took the opportunity to comment. "I feel it prudent to stress it is not Mr Summers who is charged with any offence nor his Spanish colleagues, it is the company Prion who is the employer." He also noted that there was no question in the light of Mr Summers' tested evidence of any personal responsibility of the Directors.

Mila, a Falklands registered vessel is owned by Prion Ltd. of Stanley. Mr Michael Summers has a 25.1% share in the company, but the principal shareholder is Centropesca S.A. of Las Palmas (as opposed to Freiremar S.A as stated in the companies register).

Stanley Services: Burret leaves

MANAGING Director of Stanley Services Ltd, Michael Burrett has "relinquished" his position, a press release from the company shareholders announced on Thursday.

According to Chairman of the company Mike Summers, "The local operation of Stanley Services Ltd. remains unchanged."

Foreign Office optimism for Anglo/Argentine relations

DESPITE an apparent coolness towards the Falklands on the part of the new Argentine President. Director for the Americas (FCO) Dick Wilkinson is optimistic about the future of Anglo/Argentine relations.

The Foreign and Commonwealth official told *Penguin News* this week that although, "... the impression we had up until now was that De La Rua's government was less interested in establishing close links with the Falklands... that should not affect the overall relationship between Britain and Argentina."

He gave the example that the Secretary of State for Trade and Industry who visited Argentina only a fortnight ago, "...had a very good visit.

"They went out of their way to make him feel welcome, and he went out of his way to show that Argentina has a lot of very important and interesting opportunities for British business."

Talking about the relationship between the Falklands and Argentina Mr Wilkinson said no Argentine President could "...renounce the claim because public opinion would not allow it." But he added. "what he can do and what I hope he will do is not allow the claim to dominate relations between Britain

and Argentina and above all not pursue the claim in a way that is in anyway vindictive or designed to make the Falkland Islands suffer or prevent them prospering as a self determining community.

"It is too soon to judge what his views are but I am reasonably confident that we have a good relationship with Argentina and we can manage the aspect of our relations that involve the Falklands."

Responding to a question on the

Chilean air-link he said, "I do not think you are vulnerable; it is not the only link to the outside world.... I would like the Falklands to have a number of links... but as long as we can supply you through Ascension Island there is no danger.

"LanChile is an additional convenience and it is obviously very useful but it is not absolutely essential for you. So if there was ever a threat to stop it we can face down that threat, but there is not a threat. The Argentines have given no indication in the months that I have been dealing with them that they have any objection to this arrangement."

Mr Wilkinson will be visiting Argentina in four weekstime where issues connected with the Anglo/Argentine July 14 Agreement will be raised. On hydrocarbons he explained that the last meeting had shown that Britain and Argentina had, "...differing, possibly incompatible, interpretations of the 1995 agreement. We needed to go away and think about it and then come together again and discuss whether and in what way we can continue the joint commission meetings under the terms of the 1995 agreement."

I WAS taken aback to dicover that news of Media Consultant David Scott's outburst (see page 5) against the Tristar service has apparently caused a number of individuals in the civilian community to suck in their breath with something akin to terror.

While responses of outrage or assent are what one might normally expect to be generated by a controversial point of view (and if you agree or disagree with Mr Scott please write and tell us) fear that outspoken criticism of the service might mean repercussions is a disturbing reaction.

Of course I know that the military aren't fond of criticism - who is? In fact the one time *Pengum News* dared take a pop at the forces we were all left feeling a little pistol-whipped, but that doesn't mean they don't expect it.

Yes, we are deeply grateful to have access to an air link with Britain particularly one that is not nearly as vulnerable to South American politics as that provided by LanChile.

And yes, we realise that it is to some degree an act of goodwill that the military allow civilian access to that link.

But as individuals we pay a great deal for use of that flight - and it is not a crime to debate value for money.

I would guess that the majority of Islanders have few problems with the service, particularly those who still recall when we were entirely reliant on a sea link. In fact on the matter of delays (being something of a nervous flyer) I personally am inclined to be reassured by evidence that the RAF like everything to be 'just so' before they leave the runway.

However, it is a little far fetched to assume that if we occasionally point out inadequacies in the service the Ministry of Defence will burst into tears, throw a great big tantrum and exact their revenge by booting us off the Tristar!

DESPITE attempts by *Penguin News* to secure an interview with Sir Robin Christopher (British Ambassador elect to Argentina) during his time in the Islands, it was not to be.

The gentleman was (perhaps wisely) reluctant to rub his visit too vigorously in the face of the Argentine people prior to taking up his post there. but it is reassuring that the opportunity was taken by him, in visiting the Falklands, to tactfully remind the Argentine government of our existence and of our close relationship with the British Government.

Internet portal for the people

THE creation of an Islands internet portal was recommended to the Falkland Islands Development Corporation Board on Thursday.

The aim of the internet portal is to create a platform for people to sell products and services from the Islands.

The Falkland Islands Internet Initiative (FIII) Group (a body consisting of private and public sector individuals) has been meeting in recent months to discuss how to use the internet to increase tourism and the sale of Islands products throughout the world. The portal is a key element in their e-commerce strategy.

They say the portal will be "...interesting, exciting and informative so that people will stay with the site for longer and so find out more about what we have to offer."

It will be, "...easily found by anyone looking for a range of products, services and/or information." and, "be designed in such a way that our brand messages are enhanced."

Following a tender process it has been recommended that Constructive Media Inc. design and build the portal for £30,000 (including 10% contingency).

Acting General Manger FIDC Richard Baker noted in his staff paper. "The Constructive Media Inc. offering was selected as the group felt that it offered good design elements, solid technical backup and a reasonable price."

A bid by company CrownNet was rejected due to fears over the small scale of the operation and lack of technical support.

Another company, SixtyFootSpider also tendered but, "...was not selected due to the cost and extremely high ongoing hosting and maintenance charges.

CrownNet bid £6.100 (£500 annual hosting/maintenance) and SixtyFootSpider bid £43.400 (£28.700 annual hosting/maintenance)

January start for Development Board

THE new Falkland Islands Development Board (FIDB) is scheduled to come into being on January 1, 2001.

The Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) Board this week considered, "...the roles, responsibilities and constitution of the FIDB and the Board of Falklands Landholdings."

According to an FIDC staff paper. following consultation. Executive Council agreed to create a new Board to supersede FIDC and the Agricultural Management Committee.

The FIDB will assume the following responsibilities

- encourage and assist in the economic development of the Falkland Islands;
- advise FIG on rural development, in particular the growth of business including agriculture in Camp, and the improvement of quality of life in Camp;
- advise FIG on government expenditure in agriculture;
- advise FIG on such other matters relating to economic development of the Islands as the government may refer to the Corporation or as the Corporation may consider fit and,
- examine and advise upon proposals referred to the Corporation by ExCo relating to the imposition or revision of tariffs, taxes, duties, quotas or other protective or developmental measures.

ExCo are currently considering the Chief Executive for Chair (one year) and Ron Binnie as Rural Business Association nominee (two years). Terence McPhee is likely to be the additional farmer from the FIDC Board (one year) and Sally Robertson the Chamber of Commerce nominee (two years). Cheryl Roberts may be nominated as Additional Business Person from the FIDC Board for one year.

The Board is also likely to include two councillors and the General Manager FIDC (ex officio) plus the Director of Agriculture (ex officio).

The Financial Controller FIDC, Secretary and Financial Secretary or nominee will also attend but not

The Board will be advised by the Rural Business Association (five nominated members of the Executive) and the Chamber of Commerce (Executive).

Falklands Landholdings

ExCo have also resolved to convert Falklands Landholdings Limited into a statutory corporation.

The Board of the FLH will have power to:

- •carry on business as farmers, agriculturalists, nurserymen and horticulturists;
- •to develop any land owned or leased by it, and to engage in and carry on whether or not with a view to profit or economic return any rural development (including social, cultural and economic development).
- •to undertake for the benefit of the agricultural community of the Falkland Islands and whether with a view to profit or economic return or not, marketing activities here and overseas, field trials, stud farming and the provision of seed stock and stud stock.

Islands leave their mark on MPs



FOUR British members of parliament completed their week long stay when they departed the islands on Wednesday

Penguin News spoke to three of the four MPs on the eve of their departure

Chervl Gillan MP (Conservative) spoke on behalf of her colleagues saying. "I think we've been thoroughly impressed by the hospitality we've received here and by the people we've meet.

There is a new found confidence which is so obvious and comes permeating through everybody's presentation and everything we've been shown; the enthusiasm for the Islands and the sheer guts and determination of the people has certainly left a mark on me. We appreciate greatly the opportunity to come.

"The way in which the war affected the islands in 1982 has left its mark on us. We went to visit some of the memorials and it is important to remember that people died for the freedom of the Falklands - I think this touched us all.

"I feel we're better educated, better informed and now better able to speak on issues that affect the Falklands when they come in the British Parliament.

Regarding the continuation of the military presence in the Islands. David Watts MP (Labour) stated, "There is a unanimous view within all parties that the British troops will stay here to protect the Falkland Islands. This situation can only change if there is a wish on the part of the Falklands people to change.

Asked whether the Islands lived

up to expectations, Ian Bruce MP (Conservative) responded. "I thought the economy would be all agriculture and fishing: misconceptions which have now been removed. The population here is looking at all sorts of modern occupations

Some of the things that concerned me were the problems with the air bridge because if you're wanting to run a business you have to have reliable communica-

He went on to speak of the internet: "You're actually held back because all you have are satellite communications and although they are fine, it limits the volume that you can send in and out which is going to limit your development. Most countries now have moved on to under ocean cables using fibre-optics meaning band width is going to go up a million times. Very rapidly someone needs to look at linking into these networks.

Speaking of the recent visit to the Islands by ex Argentine Foreign Minister Guido Di Tella, Ms Gillan stated, "By actually going to the airport to meet Di Tella he was in fact establishing the position of the British vis-a-vis the Is-

Di Tella being met by the British Governor of the Falkland Islands, however much people may have interpreted it in another way, really meant that Di Tella was also admitting that this was part of the United Kingdom.

"I think it was a fair and valid point to be made by the Gover-

Asked for news of the possibility of future mine clearance he said he believed that as a result of a British delegation visiting Argentina, "..the idea of a feasibility study has been accepted and we now need to agree on the arrangements for the exact nature of the contract that will go to the private (British) company chosen to undertake the study

"The first meeting (on the subject of mines) was reported to have been both friendly and businesslike. The Argentines are committed to it and have put a sum of money aside in their budget for it."

Regarding the proposed Falklands constitution review he emphasised, "It is very much our view that it is not the councillors that decide

the constitution it is the people of the Falklands as a whole.

"The significant area is to what extent councillors are accountable and to what extent they are directly responsible to take executive decisions on policy.

He believed consensual style government to be acceptable providing information was properly disseminated and decision making wasn't "too cosy." He noted that there was some interest among councillors in a more ministerial style government.

Mr Wilkinson, who is the official responsible for implementing policy towards the Americas and overseas territories, left the Islands on Wednesday.

Sun comes out for Dolphins opening

A LARGE proportion of Stanley's elderly community witnessed the official opening of the Dolphins Guesthouse on Wednesday

In recognition of the historical importance of the building, formerly known as the Warrah Guesthouse. Stanley's newest accommodation facility was opened by Stanley's second eldest resident. Mrs Vi Bonner.

Prior to opening, proprietor Mrs June Besley Clark spoke to Penguin News about her new venture. She highlighted the importance of creating a, "...homely and cosy atmosphere that people will feel is comfortable.

Mrs Besley-Clark described the facilities on offer at the Dolphins: We have bed and breakfast accommodation at a cost of £26 and if residents require evening meals they are also available. Laundry facilities are available at extra cost and we also have ironing boards and irons for guests to use.

"We have coffee and tea rooms which are open to the public from 10.00am through to 6.00pm, seven days a week. We are trying to put it across in the old tea room style, with cream teas, as I'm from Devon

"We have disabled access through a side entrance and child facilities with high chairs and a baby changing unit.

I am not sure our employees (virtually all local citizens), the Falkland Islands Government (who benefit from Corporation Tax) or indeed most rational customers would share this view.

Frealise that making a profit is some sort of heinous crime and for this reason I am sure that none of the contractors employed by the MOD make a profit out of their operations in the Falkland Islands.

Cable & Wireless' tour of duty in the Falkland Islands has extended for over 25 years and during that time we have been pleased to provide a service to MOD personnel, although to somewhat smaller numbers prior to 1982

It has also involved and continues to involve substantial investment in installing, operating and maintaining the network and introducing new services where we can.

I find it curious that when almost everything in the Falkland

Islands, or for that matter most small remote communities, is more expensive why it is that people expect telecommunications services to escape this additional expense.

As for our prices we are regulated by the Government and require their approval for all of our basic telephone tariffs not a situation that applies to most businesses here

The second letter was from Mr Doherty who in addition to calling me a liar seems to prefer to support companies that provide no investment, employment or contribution to the wellbeing of the Falkland Islands.

Despite the fact that Mr. Doherty doesn't believe my statements I will repeat for everyone else that Cable & Wireless has not and is not at present taking any action that would affect call back services.

A company of the size and reputation of Cable & Wireless has no need to lie. If we were taking any action I would be fully prepared to make a public statement to that effect and thereafter let the legal process take its natural course.

Pushed to the limit - Media Consultant David Scott slams the RAF

IT has been a bad few weeks in the UK what with government ministers telling us that after all we should not have been eating beef during the nineties, the bad weather bringing the country to a halt, threats of no petrol supplies soon and a rail system which goes from bad to worse.

So it was with some anticipation I looked forward to my 11 days in the Falklands training staff on Penguin News and FIBS as well as talking to Corona and other groups. I had happy memories of my last trip just over two years ago.

All that came to a shuddering halt at Brize Norton this week. If that is the main route into the Islands, then tourism has a bleak future. I gave up and went home, driving four hours through storms rather than get on an aircraft the RAF couldn't get mechanically right for one of the twice-weekly flights via Ascension.

Before I made my decision to go home at 6pm on Tuesday (the flight should have gone at 11pm Monday) I had endured what other passengers told me is becoming a regular occurrence.

I had seen the frustrations, anger and tears of Islanders who rely on this service to see family and friends in the UK. They had no choice but to sit it out no matter how long it took, many of them having been at Brize Norton since Monday afternoon.

I was one of a number of business and media passengers who opted not to give the RAF an openended ticket to keep us waiting in awful conditions for as long as it suited them.

The attitude of staff at Brize Norton showed how far the UK has sunk when it comes to offering anything like a decent service to people who in some cases had paid a small fortune for their journey.

If a commercial airline treated its passengers anything like I was treated it would never be out of the courts.

Communication was very poor with everyone kept on tenterhooks all day as to what the true position was

Every hour we were told "...just hold on a bit longer" after being herded into the final departure section. Attempts to find out when we would eventually fly out met a stonewall of officialdom. Of course we all wanted to know the plane was safe, but if the RAF cannot service two planes a week to the Falklands it shows what a mess the country is in.

They knew on the Sunday things were wrong, but by Tuesday night had still not rectified them. What an indictment! I reached the point where I didn't want to fly on THAT plane.

Conditions in the departure lounge were far from ideal after we had left Halfway House (I refuse to call it a hotel). We were given some tea/coffee/orange during the afternoon but there was no water to drink. I need to drink eight litres a day for my migraine problem so when my personal supply ran out I asked for some and was told none was available, but I could use the

taps in the toilet. I declined the invitation to give myself stomach trouble

Lalso declined the offer to share a room with no toilet overnight at Halfway House. I resented very much the 'take it or leave it' attitude. Why weren't we told much earlier that there was a good chance the flight wouldn't go for a second day? At least then we could have gone out for the day or made other arrangements. Nobody would answer that question.

There was no help at all for the mothers with children or the elderly Islanders making their way home. I felt very sorry for them because at least I had an option. I was one of the more fortunate ones because I had good company in the shape of John Halford and Debbie Summers, but after 10 hours even that became wearing for all of us.

My anger eventually erupted when they told us we would have to collect all our baggage, check it out, go to Halfway House and then go through the whole thing the following day.

An aggressive official who had

probably had enough as well, but who had few personnel skills, got the full blast. "Tell me," I asked. "If we were at war again with Argentina would you lot end up bombing Falkirk rather than the Falklands?"

"If you talk like that you will be on a charge," was the reply from the official who thought I was in the forces. I retorted: "Like to see you try and while we are at it I now know why only two per cent of our bombs hit their targets in Kosovo." It was rude, but that is what happens when you get pushed to limits.

I wasn't prepared to put up with it any longer and off I went to collect my baggage, cart it back to my car and drive home. The flight did leave on Wednesday at Ipm. I hope there were no more problems, but it is time people began to shout about this appalling service, the cost and the way people are treated. I wasn't the only one to go home and I couldn't think of a more effective way of keeping people away from the Falklands.

C&W - No monopoly in Seychelles

I AM afraid that your unnamed correspondent who wrote that Cable and Wireless enjoy a monopoly in the Seychelles is incorrect.

That will have been the case until sometime in the late nineties but then the firm AirTel Telecom Services began providing competition and we were able to purchase a mobile phone when on holiday

there last Christmas at a very advantageous price.

We actually bought it from Cable and Wireless but I am certain we would have had to pay a great deal more had it not been for some very fierce competition between the two companies.

RFIP - 24 hour radio watch

COULD someone please advise the public whether the Royal Falkland Islands Police are supposed to answer calls made to them on any of the radio frequencies that are listed in the *Penguin News* each week. If the police do maintain a 24 hour listening watch how many times should a member of the public be expected to call them before an answer is received.

Response by Acting Chief Police Officer:

The Royal Falkland Islands Police maintain a listening watch on the frequencies shown in the *Penguin News*. This is achieved by the use of a dedicated set that continuously scans the appropriate channels.

However the ability of the system to receive transmissions is limited by the position and the standard of the antenna. At present,

(30.10.00) the Mount Kent Repeater linked to the Mount Alice Repeater is not operational, therefore any calls made to the RFIP through either of these repeaters will not be received. The Port Howard Repeater cannot be received or operated from the Police Station and the Pebble Island Repeater can only be received or worked occasionally depending on conditions.

The 2m calling channel can only be received locally and is subject to all the radio blind spots and range difficulties normally associated with the frequency.

The Royal Falkland Islands Police is pleased to receive any concerns from members of the public. They should be addressed to the Chief Police Officer, Royal Falkland Islands Police, Stanley. He can be contacted by letter, fax, e-mail or by telephone.

FIG - no involvement in house construction

THE following statement is in response to a question which asked why FIG/PWD do not undertake a project involving the construction of starter homes and flats.

Reply from Mr M J Forrest, Director of Public Works.

THE Falkland Islands Government took a decision nearly hine years ago that it would no longer be involved in the construction of houses, your front page of 10 January 1992 refers.

Since that time a private sector has developed which is meeting the demand for private sector housing and has also, when required, constructed houses for FIG under contract. The PWD does not have sufficient resources, tradesmen or management, to become involved in house construction and at the same time meet its current commitments on minor new works and maintenance.

It is acknowledged that there is a shortage of tradesmen and that this shortage is not confined to the Falkland Islands. The number of apprentices under training with the PWD is more than the department's projected future need for the tradesmen. The private sector decides how many apprentices it wishes to train. Apprentices with PWD and the private sector follow a similar training programme. Apprentices assigned to the PWD are able to obtain the required experience without the Department becoming involved in house construction, for example PWD apprentices were recently seconded to the private sector.

Placements with the private sector are and will continue to be an element of PWD apprenticeships - this is to provide experience of works such as construction of houses, as well as private sector management and working practices.

He said he had suggested the painful idea as a fund-raiser after some friends had joked about his hairy chest in the pub a few night


"I also thought there might be a few people who would enjoy in-flicting pain on me," said Craig.



Uruguay and Chile Praised at Shackleton Exhibition

THE Ambassadors of Uruguay and Chile were distinguished guests at the opening of a major exhibition commemorating—the famous Antarctic explorer. Sir Ernest Shackleton, at Dulwich College in London, where their countries help and support in rescuing some of his men from his 1914 Endurance expedition came in for praise.

The exhibition was opened by Emest Shackleton's grand-daughter, the Honourable Alexandra Shackleton. President of the James Caird Society, named after the explorer's famous lifeboat. This is on permanent show at Dulwich College, where he had been a pupil.

The opening ceremony began with a message of congratulation from the Governor of the Falkland Islands, Donald Lamont, read out by former Falklands Governor, David Tatham, London Chairman of the Shackleton Scholarship Fund-

Governor Lamont, who is also Commissioner for South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands, sent good wishes from the Shackleton Scholarship Committee in the Falkland Islands. He paid tribute to Shackleton's courage, true heroism. unparalleled determination and deen commitment to his men which had earned him a very special place in history. Recalling his recent visit to Ernest Shackleton's grave in South Georgia, Mr Lamont said: "No one who stands there can remain unmoved by the astonishing majesty of the place or the memory of all that Shackletonexperienced.

Alexandra Shackleton spoke of the four essential qualities her grandfather had listed for a polar explorer: "Optimism. Patience, Imagination with which he linked idealism, and Courage." Shackleton related these qualities to those any man might need in the journey through life. These qualities, she said, had been splendidly demonstrated by the Master of Dulwich College, Dr Graham Able and the main exhibition organiser, Dulwich College Curator Dr Jan Piggott.

Piggott.
Welcoming the Ambassador of
Uruguay, His Excellency Dr
Agustin Espinosa-Lloverasand the
Ambassador of Chile, Dr Christian
Barros, Alexandra Shackleton
declared: "The story of Ernest
Shackleton and the Endurance
Expedition would have been very
different without Uruguay and
Chile.

"Both were very supportive of the expedition. And both countries took part in the four hazardous journeys to rescue Shackleton's men left behind on Elephant Island, finally successful with the Chilean ship. Yelcho, manned by volunteers from the Chilean Navy, whose officers and men rejoiced at the rescue of Shackleton's men.... Years later Uruguay gave Ernest Shackleton a magnificent, moving State funeral, attended by the President of Uruguay... There can be no greater tribute for a country to pay to the citizen of another country than to treat him as one of their own."

This exhibition, centred on his old school, continues the remarkable revival of interest in Shackleton, nearly eighty years after his death, which shows no sign of slackening off. A quarter of a million visitors attended Shackleton exhibitions last year in the United States, in New York and Washington. A spate of new books, films, television and radio programmes, and media articles have focused on his exploits.

Guests at the Dulwich opening included Rear Admiral Roy Clare. Director of the National Maritime Museum at Greenwich, which is coincidentally running another major exhibition about Shackleton and other explorers and their race to be first to reach the South Pole. One guest came to Dulwich from as far as Arizona in the United States — Shane Murphy, a former Grand Canyon river guide, who has written a book about the Shackleton Expedition's famous photographer, Frank Hurley.

Hurley's photographs are a feature of the Dulwich Exhibition, along with oil paintings by another expedition member. George Marston: a Shackleton expedition flag from the Royal Collection: and memorabilia from the National Maritime Museum, the Royal Geographical Society, the Scott Polar Research Institute at Cambridge, the Science Museum and other institutions, the Shackleton family, and from descendants of Shackleton's men.

Profits from the exhibition, which continues for nearly four months until February 25th, will be shared equally between a new Shackleton Bursary at Dulwich College and the national Shackleton Scholarship Fund, set up to benefit the Falkland Islands, in memory of Ernest Shackleton and his son, Lord Shackleton. Duke of Edinburgh Unveils Royal Marines Memorial

THE Royal Marines Memorial in the Mall, London, renovated with a £15,000 (22,000 dollar) contribution from the Falkland Islands Government, has been formally unveiled by the Duke of Edinburgh, Captain General Royal Marines (on 29th October).

Several Royal Marines who fought in the 1982 Conflict were present.

The Marines put up a gallant defence of Stanley and later joined the Task Force in the recapture of the Islands. Nearly fifty per cent of the Corps were deployed, led by two Royal Marines Land Force Commanders, Major General Sir Jeremy Moore, and Brigadier, later Major General, Julian Thompson.

The Falklands Government donation was previously handed

over by Councillor Sharon Halford (on October 9th) to meet the shortfall needed for the Appeal to reach its target of £85,000.

The statue, crected in 1903, has been restored as part of a Millennium Year initiative, to become a National Memorial in tribute to Royal Marines who served all round the Globe in the 20th Century.

The Falkland Islands have a long association with the Royal Marines who helped build the first British settlement on the Islands in 1766. In 1964 a permanent detachment was established. In 1976 the Islands conferred the Freedom of Stanley upon the Royal Marines in appreciation of their close links for more than two centuries."

CHILE AND MERCOSUR

AT the end of a three day official visit to Uruguay, Chilean President Ricardo Lagos clearly outlined the two sides of the Mercosur membership his country has been courting with for the last few years.

"It's impossible for us to adapt to the current Mercosur tariff convergence since our external tariffs are lower and it would make no sense to hike them again," said President Lagos addressing the Uruguayan General Assembly, a message which he later repeated in meetings with local businessmen.

But Mr. Lagos did emphasize that Chile was very much interested in "political understandings," that lead to a better defence of the region's economic and political interests, in dealings with other

"The fundamental issue is how do we insert ourselves and the region in the world, and if Mercosur is the mechanism, welcome, we want to join," pointed out President Lagos, warning that, "if each of our countries acts individually, we're not going to get very far.

In line with this basic idea and confirming Chile's interest in joining "political" Mercosur, Uruguayan President Jorge Batlle and Mr. Lagos signed a joint declaration insisting on the necessity, "to preserve the convergence of macroeconomic policies," avoiding sudden disruptive currency devaluations, "...that alter collective previously organised targets.

Presidents Lagos and Batlle also agreed that Mercosur needs an effective institutional framework including a technical Secretariat and courts for trade disputes and litigations, instead, "of presidents on the phone whenever conflicts of this nature emerge."

Chile's current external tariffs average 9% and will experience a further reduction next year. The Mercosur common external tariff schedule is at least five years behind Chile's.

A CRITICAL WEEK

URUGUAYAN officials consider that there's still a critical week ahead before, "things begin to normalise," and the foot and mouth outbreak in the north of Uruguay next to the Brazilian border, which was reported in mid September, can be considered under control.

Using for the first time the, "sanitary rifle," the Uruguayan Army have so far shot and buried 22,000 livestock, (cattle, sheep and hogs) in a five kilometres radius of the farm where a sow and her suckling were first reported to have the dreaded virus.

Although no cattle was found with symptoms, blood samples sent to the regional Foot and Mouth Disease Centre in Rio do Janeiro confirmed that they had been in contact with the disease, and could be in the process of incubating it.

However by the time the results аrrived, Uruguavan authorities had cordoned off the county of Artigas with Army and river patrols, and no livestock in the area can be moved from their paddocks. Across the border Brazilian patrols are also controlling that no animal origin food enters or leaves Uruguay.

In spite of the terrible losses, the quick and open response of the Uruguayan government to the crisis has had a positive impact overseas: most beef clients have announced they will resume purchases, while President Lagos during his visit to Uruguav made a similar announcement. It is expected that Nafta countries (USA, Canada and Mexico), which have become Uruguay's main purchaser, will lift the momentary ban by the end of the month.

This week farmers in Artigas began to receive the first cheques for the 2.5 million US dollars in compensations.

Cattle prices have dropped 20/ 25% since the outbreak and the meat packing industry, with 15,000 tonnes stored, has been forced to leave hundreds of workers redundant.

Social Impact

THE foot and mouth outbreak in Uruguay not only has had an overall impact on the cattle and beef industry; it also unravelled a whole way of life in the common border area with Brazil based in a completely "open economy, which is now threatened by the strict sanitary and military controls.

Residents along the open border between Uruguay and Brazil make their shopping wherever it's cheaper; traditionally Brazilians purchase wool and leather goods plus duty free imported cigarettes and spirits in Uruguay, while Uruguayans cross or simply have delivered at their homes cooking fuel, staple food, cotton goods, cheap tobacco, chocolate and liquor,

plus poultry and pork.
This has now been seriously curtailed and local "suppliers" of this trade, plus consumers, in protest blocked international bridges for a couple of days requesting a lessening of controls. Discussions are on to decide what products and what quantities will be allowed.

But behind this apparently innocent "making ends meet" of local residents strict controls have also uncovered a far greater industry, a smuggling network that virtually delivers merchandise wholesale well inside both countries, Montevideo and Sao Paulo, involving officials on both

sides of the border.

Uruguayan authorities have removed Customs Officers in several border locations and an investigation into the extend of the network has begun.

"FAVOURABLE" PROSPECTS IN spite of the adverse numbers. Uruguay's economic prospects in

the medium term are favourable since the country is making the necessary adjustments to the situation and the exchange rate policy has helped recover

competitiveness.

According to International Monetary Fund, IMF, Technical Officer Bob Traa, the results of the current policies, "are having effect although people don't perceive them yet," and three main achievements can be pointed out.

Mr. Traa firstly named changes in the aggregate demand, now more oriented to exports instead of local consumption: secondly geographical "diversification" of exports and finally, without a nominal devaluation, the exchange rate policy has corrected half of the "Brazilian devaluation effect." '99). meaning an (January important recovery competitiveness.

The IMF delegation said that overall prospects are favourable although conditioned to external factors and the "negative feeling" about the future, that seems to have spilt over from Argentina, that affects consumption investment decisions.

DE LA RÚA'S STANDING

PRESIDENT De la Rúa and his administration's standing have dropped in public consideration following the last political and economic events, according to a Gallup poll published in the Argentine media.

Only 11% of those polled expressed a positive opinion of the Argentine government, 38% was negative and 48% moderate. As far as President De la Rúa. 32% have a positive image, 27% negative and 37% moderate. But when it comes to actually running the country, 63% said they were dissatisfied. 26% backed Mr. De la Rúa and 11% didn't reply.

The poll was done the last week of October, in 28 locations of Argentina with a 3.8% margin or

However October results indicate a 5 and 8 point drop for the Argentine President compared to the previous month when 34% of those polled backed Mr. De la

Looking ahead, 49% believe political and social conditions will be more difficult while only 23% stated that conditions will improve, and 13% that they will remain normal.

Unemployment is the main concern for Argentines; 57% believe it could get worse, 25% it will remain at current levels and 11% that it will diminish.

Concerning former vice president Carlos Alvarez, the polls indicated that 54% disapproved his

resignation and 66% believe he should continue to support the government.

PATAGONIAN DEMANDS A SUMMIT of Patagonian governors held this week in San Martin de los Andes rejected the federal government's project to eliminate fuel subsidies in Patagonia and demanded a fair deal in the

Governors from La Pampa, Rio Negro. Chubut and Neuquen recalled that 80% of Argentina's hydrocarbons come from Patagonia and demanded that those aspects of constitutional jurisdiction belonging to the provinces, over these resources be applied.

coming hydrocarbons legislation.

Governors also anticipated they will demand in court 200 million US dollars in unpaid taxes from energy and oil companies operating

in Patagonia.

In a final statement the governors requested the funds promised by the federal government to finish the Trans-Patagonian train and a rail pass to Chile, and asked the sanctioning of a law confirming reimbursements for goods exported from Patagonian ports.

OIL PRICES BULLISH

OPEC countries will not increase oil production until industrialised countries begin acting to reduce the price of fuel at the pump level, said Ali Rodriguez Venezuelan Minister of Energy and Mineral Resources.

In an interview with a Japanese newspaper Mr. Rodríguez said the latest OPEC half a million barrel production increase effective October 31, could be "useless" unless there's a concerted effort from industrialised countries.

"European taxes on oil are far off. United States doesn't have sufficient refining capacity and speculation has taken over the futures market," underlined Mr. Rodriguez adding that a more "responsible attitude" from these countries is required.

Mr. Rodriguez predicted that although a further production increase is forecast for the end of November, to help with coming winter demand, it will depend of an OPEC meeting in Vienna.

If we consider the increase will have no effect, and we see no concerted effort, we might turn back," indicated Mr. Rodríguez.

However, Caribbean countries and Cuba should be able to cope: following an official one week visit to Venezuela by Cuban leader Fidel Castro, Venezuelan president Hugo Chávez announced a daily supply at "reasonable" prices of several tens of thousands of barrels to his new oil short friends.



Argentine UN Ambassadors have been residing in that building since 1982 however Foreign Affairs Minister has decided the acquisition of an official residence on a leasing system, but it will not be ready until next May.

ARGENTINA WILL HONOUR DEBT

ARGENTINE president Fernando De la Rúa ratified this week that Argentina will honour all its foreign debt payments, insisting that any other comments on the issue "are inadmissible

President De la Rúa was forced to make the public statement after former president Raúl Alfonsín said that if all monies needed to pay interest rates on foreign debt for the next two years were invested in Argentina. "we could rapidly overcome recession.

With markets particularly sensitive, after the American risk agency Standard & Poor last week lowered Argentine bonds and papers ratings outlook, Mr. Alfonsin's words were most unfortunate and apparently misinterpreted by international brokers

"Although it's true that Mr. Alfonsin later said he hadn't meant what was attributed to him, there are very sensitive issues that must be addressed explicitly or not at all." underlined Mr. De la Rúa adding that as president he ratified the standing constitutional of convertibility and the one dollarone peso exchange rate.

Since Mr. Alvarez resigned as vice president last September, the De la Rúa administration is facing a political credibility factor with

direct consequences in volatile financial markets, meaning Argentina has had to pay higher interest rates for new credits.

However Argentine Economy Minister José Luis Machinea pointed out that "foreign debt payments next year will not differ from those in 1997, '98 and '99."

NEW WEB SITE MAKES FALKLANDSWAR CHAPELA "VIRTUAL" CHURCH

THE Falklands Memorial Chapel, a small modern church which uses traditional religious features as well as computer technology to remember the British Servicemen who died in the Falklands War, now has an official web site.

Those visiting www.Falklands-Chapel.org.uk can enjoy a virtual tour of the modern building, which was opened by the Queen last year. gathering information about the war and the men who died in it.

While the web site may be blazing a trail for "virtual" churches, it is unlikely that computer visits will replace the poignancy of actual remembrance in the building which has been variously described as resembling the shape of a ship and a pair of cradling hands. WOOL REPORT: for the week ending Friday, November 3

Prices were down in all the main markets this week. In Australia, the Eastern Market Indicator (EMI) eased throughout the week. The EMI lost five cents on Tuesday, dropped another two cents on Wednesday and lost a further four cents on Thursday, to close the week down eleven cents at 729 A cents per kg. In South Africa the Cape Wool Merino Indicator dropped 1.1 percent to end at 2102 SA cents/kg clean.

In New Zealand the Fine Indicator lost 36 cents to 1629 NZ cents, the Medium Indicator dropped 28 cents to 542 NZ cents whilst the Strong Indicator went down 21 cents to 415 NZ cents. In Bradford there was a poor take-up and the UK indicator eased 2 pence to close at 70 pence per Kg greasy.

The Australian wool stockpile that in February 1991 stood at 4.72 million bales was reduced to 603.202 at the end of September 2000. It is now anticipated that the stockpile could be gone completely in less than two years.

All efforts that contribute to the minimisation of dark coloured fibre contamination within the Falkland clip have always been encouraged by the Agency. Farmers are thus very much encouraged to utilise the current FIG incentives to adopt the QFW scheme quality assurance practises.



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

September and October - Children's Nature Calendar

by Megan Eggeling SEPTEMBER and October -Spring months of the Falklands. A stir of excitement throughout Nature. Time for new life in plant and bird and beast. But Winter, this year, hung about. Spring could only peep through from time to time.

Against the dull background of sleety wetness of early September, however, there were splashes of cheerful colour in flocks of lovely Rufous-chested Dotterel, some newly back from South America and all bright in their breeding plumage-deep chestnut bibs edged with black, grey-blue faces, broad white eyebrow. You may come across their very shallow nests with 2 greenish-brown eggs with black blotches on Stanley Common or anywhere in 'diddle-dee country'.

On fresh-water ponds the pretty Yellow-billed (Speckled) Teal and even prettier Silver Teal also brightened the September greyness. The Yellow-billed Teal is an early breeder and lays up to 8 reddishcream eggs. I haven't seen any young yet, but another pretty duck, a Chiloe Wigeon (black-faced with white earmuffs) was spotted with young early in October at the Canache. By mid to late October Patagonian Crested Ducks and Loggers already had their chicks doing swimming lessons in the waters of Stanley Harbour. Where do these larger ducks like the Logger and the similar Flying Steamer Duck lay their eggs? They like to make their nests in diddle-dee. grass, rushes, dry kelp or old Jackass Penguin burrows and even in gorse, sometimes up to 1/4 mile inland. Just think of the distance the tiny chick has to run to get its



first swim next time you are forced to do a 400m round the playing field!

A pair of the smallest and least common of the Falklands' gulls visited the Harbour at the end of October They were Brown-hooded Gulls, suitably named as they have a deep chocolate-coloured head. They also have a strange rosy flush down the chest. It's a very handsome bird which breeds late in the year. Another late breeder is the largest of the Falklands' gulls, the Kelp Gull. During September and October platoons of them, black and white adults and speckled juveniles, have been stomping soggy fields for grubs or squatting along grassy shores. Victory Green is one of their favourite campsites, it

Mid-September, of course, is the magic time for the return of the Magellanic (Jackass) Penguins. At Gypsy Cove and other sites where there is soft peaty soil, it was a busy time for them as they spring-cleaned their underground homes and recarpeted them with diddledee and tussac. It's worthwhile

making them really comfortable as they'll be there until next March/April! Each breeding pair should have laid 2 eggs by mid-October, one 4 days after the other. Egg-sitting (incubation) will last 5-6 weeks while 'dad' shoots off to sea for the first 2-3 weeks, then returns to do his turn at egg-sitting. The ground-nesting *Gentoo*, meanwhile, were laying eggs from late September.

It's not only the sights but the sounds of the 'breeding months' which make this season so pleasant. You can follow the beautiful song of the Grass Wren to a Fachine bush, perhaps, and there, if you are lucky, eatch sight of that tiny plump little bird with its short wings and upright tail, before it darts off, wings whirring, to the next bush. Another good singer is the Falkland Pipit (locally called Skylark). I watched one performing a remarkable solo high up above Stanley Common one late October afternoon. Black-throated Finches have also been taking centre-stage on fence-posts, bushes and tussacs to deliver their song and Blackchinned Siskins (Canaries) have been trilling loudly and prettily nonstop for several minutes high up in the trees behind Government House....

Since Jenny reported from Sea Lion Island on the first Sea Elephant pup born early in September, many more black pups have appeared, been suckled and abandoned. The very, very large bulls have continued to raise their strange inflatable probosces (snouts) and bellow warnings to any challenging males nearby... Many of the females had already left by late October, their abandoned pups lying, like great grey slugs, all along the shore... Five Killer Whales were seen patrolling just offshore.

Springtime is flowertime and invading armies of dandelions started their unstoppable march through the land. The Dusty Miller Primrose, with its globe of little white flowers began to cover south-eastern stretches of Cape Pembroke while the ground-hugging Marsh Marigold flowers, like hundreds of little yellow nightlights, emerged from their glossy arrow-shaped leaves all around shores and ponds

In the very last week of October the *Pale Maidens* appeared. Their delicate white bells nodded shyly at first above the heath plants at Whalebone Cove and then in Memorial Wood. A little birthday bouquet of these sweet flowers would surely make a delightful offering!....... (But do make sure, before you pick any other wild flower, that it is not on the 'Protected List').

Happy November sightings! Hopefully, a Chilean Swallow will be one of them and summer will be here!

UKOTCF Calpe 2000: Linking the fragments of paradise

THE UK Overseas Territories Conservation Forum (UKOTCF). Calpe 2000. was attended by Falkland Conservation representatives Becky Ingham. Debbie Summers and Ann Brown.

The Conference took place in GibraltAr from September 28 to October 1 and, according to Ms Summers, was attended, "...by ninety-six delegatesworld wide from places such as the Turks and Caicos Islands, Seychelles, Pitcaim Island, St Helena and Ascension Islands, Anguilla, Bermuda and the Cayman Islands to name but a few."

The UK Overseas Territories Conservation Forum brings together non-governmentalorganisations and institutions involved with furthering conservation of the natural heritage in the Overseas Territories.

The UKOTCF is concerned with the socio-economic issues that affect the natural environment. Ms Summers told *Penguin News* the aims of the conference were: "To promote environmental awareness and education, to increase information

networking, to outline tourism issues and promote funding for the environment, to make protected areas effective and to explain biodiversity action planning.

"The conference was a working meeting helping territories take conservation issues forward. Emphasis was placed on sharing knowledge and experience between workers from the various UK Overseas Territories. Each territory represented had the opportunity to put up a display. The Falklands display was extremely well attended and all information leaflets were distributed.

"Much was learned from all sides, contacts were made and faces put to names. Expertise and experiences were outlined and much learnt from this sharing of information."

Ms Summers was able to attend the forum due to the assistance received from local organisations. She said, "I would like to warmly thank the Shackleton Scholarship Fund, the John Cheek Trust and the Argos Challenge Award for sponsoring my attendance at this conference."

ATHLETE'S foot is a skin infection caused by a fungus germ.

It is very common. About 1 in 10 people in the UK are thought to have athlete's foot at any given

Some types of fungus germs (fungi) like to live in human skin. If conditions are right they can 'invade' the skin, multiply and cause

The conditions fungi like best are warm, moist and airless areas of skin such as between the toes. Athlete's foot can also be passed on from person to person.

For example, this may occur in communal showers that athletes or swimmers use where many people wash. If a tiny flake of infected skin from a person with athlete's foot falls off whilst washing it may be trodden on by others who may then develop the infection.

What are the symptoms of athlete's foot?

The skin between the toes (usually the little toes) tends to be affected at first. A rash develops that becomes itchy and scaly. The skin may become cracked and sore. Tiny flakes of infected skin may fall off. The rash may spread gradually along the toes if left untreated.

Is athlete's foot serious?

Usually not: most people treat their itchy toes before it spreads much. Sometimes the infection spreads to the skin on other parts of the body

Fungi do not usually go deeper than the skin into the body. However, other germs (bacteria) may come through the cracked skin of untreated athlete's foot and occasionally cause more serious infections of the foot or leg.



What is the treatment for athlete's foot?

Keep the foot as dry as possible at all times. On top of that one can use a simple foot powder available in local shops.

Basichygiene including changing socks daily will improve matters dramatically. In more severe cases (oozing, wounds etc.) a doctor's opinion might be warranted.

The following tips may prevent athlete's foot recurring:

- Wash feet and toes daily.
- Dry the skin between the toes thoroughly after washing. This is perhaps the most important point. It is tempting to put on socks when the feet are not quite dry. The soggy skin between the toes is then ideal for fungi to grow.
- Do not share towels in communal changing rooms.
- Change socks daily. Fungi may multiply in flakes of skin in unwashed socks. Cotton socks and leather footwear are better than nylon socks and plastic footwear that increase sweating
- It is ideal to leave shoes and socks off as much as possible but this may not be practical.

Recipes for the Falklands



IN this section since May I have featured recipes from Chile, England, Italy, Germany, Greece, Poland, India, Scotland and USA, plus a royal special or two.

Now seems as good a time as any to venture in a different direction and see how the Australians cook.

I always had the impression that they lived on barbecues, Anzacs and beer in their native habitat.

However, just call me ignorant and invite me to more Australian social events. I liked what I found. This bread is really easy and basically a jazzed up scone mix. Invent your own version - tuna; baked bean; Sunday joint leftovers; kipper. Be creative!

Corn and Pepper Pinwheel by Elizabeth Villalon

Ingredients

425g plain flour

3tsp baking powder

40g butter

25g parmesan cheese

Itbsp rosemary 125ml milk

160ml water

2 peppers - chop very finely or they won't cook

3 thsp onion - chop very finely or they won't cook

130g creamed corn (optional)

2 tbsp breadcrumbs

4 rashers bacon - cooked and chopped

Grease a shallow, 23 cm round cake tin

Rub the flour and baking powder into the butter. Stir in the cheese, rosemary, salt, milk and enough water to form a soft dough.

Roll out into a long rectangle (24 x 30cm) ending with the long edge towards you.

Sprinkle the peppers and onions along the front long edge.

Cover the centre half with the creamed corn, breadcrumbs and

Brush the border with water and roll up from the pepper edge into a swiss roll shape.

Cut into 12 rounds and place cut side down in the tin. Bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve hot.

Weather summary for October 2000

THE weather for October was slightly colder than average with frequent snow/hail showers.

The average temperature for the month was 10.2C, slightly lower than the long term average of 10.5C.

Temperature

The highest recorded temperature was 16.4C on October 31 whilst a high of 4.1C on October 27 was the lowest recorded during

The average minimum temperature for the month was 1.5C. slightly below the long term mean of 2.4C. The lowest minimum was -2.4C on October 20. There were ten nights with air frost and fifteen nights with ground frost.

Rainfall

Rainfall was well below average, 30.3mm compared to the long term average of 38.2mm. The greatest amount in a day was 13.5mm on October 20. There were seventeen days with 0.1 mm or more and eight days with 1.0mm or more.

Snow fell on eleven days of the month and lay on one. The greatest depth was 0.5cm, measured on October 11.

Sunshine

The total sunshine recorded was 147.3 hours, the long term average for October being 173.2 hours

Wind/Gales

The mean wind for the month was 16.6 knots, slightly above the average monthly mean of 16.2 knots.

Gales (34 knots or more over a ten minute period) occurred on seven days. The highest gusts recorded was 52 knots on October 20 and 26, and gusts exceeding 33 knots occurred on nineteen days. the average being 18.7 days.

PUBLIC NOTICE FROM THE RETIREMENT PENSIONS BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

RETIREMENT PENSIONS FUND

CLAIMING A PENSION

Contributors to the Retirement Pensions Fund (previously known as the Old Age Pensions Fund) are reminded to claim a pension upon reaching the age of 64 years. For widows and widowers a pension may be claimed upon reaching the age of 60 years. Claim to Pension Forms can be obtained from the Pensions Officer at the Treasury.

APPLYING FOR CONTRIBUTION CREDITS

It is compulsory for all persons resident in the Falkland Islands between the ages of 17 to 64, and who have earnings in excess of the current limit of £60 per week, to contribute to the Fund. It is important for all contributors to have as full a pension record as possible. An incomplete pension record will result in only a partial pension at retirement. Any person who considers they are unable to afford making contributions are advised to contact the Pensions Officer at the Treasury to see if they are eligible to apply to the Board of Management for assistance. Under certain circumstances the Government will pay contributions on behalf of contributors. To be eligible a person must be earning less than the current earnings limit of £60 per week and (£70 from 1 January 2001) and:
- entitled to a family allowance, or

- entitled to an attendance (carer's) allowance, or
- unable to work due to ill health, or
- following a prescribed course of education/training, or
- actively seeking employment.



Team investigate runway gusts

THE affect of runway crosswinds on the Tristar is costing the Ministry of Defence a fortune, so a team of meteorologists have been hired to examine the problem.

The dangerous gusts are currently the subject of investigations by a team from the University of Leeds and the University of Manchester Institute of Science and Technology.

Talking to Penguin News this week Professor Stephen Mobbs explained that the expense of flying the Tristar is greatly increased as a result of the aircraft leaving Ascension Island and travelling for five or six hours towards the Falklands, only to have to turn back due to gusty crosswinds at MPA.

If severe winds and turbulence

in the area could be predicted twelve hours in advance the Tristar could wait out the bad weather on the ground on Ascension Island.

The gusts occur during northerly winds and the problem arises due to the location of the airport downwind from the two ranges of hills centred on Mount Wickham and Mount Simon.

Turbulent gusts, or eddies, roll down from these hills. This effect is termed "rotor streaming" by meteorologists.

The study aims to develop new techniques for predicting the troublesome weather and involves installing 23 automatic weather stations around the airport.

Depression 'very common' problem in the Falklands

A HEALTH report by the Chief Medical Officer (CMO) has identified depression as"... very common in the Falklands."

In Health of the Nation 2000, a paper designed to highlight the major health issues affecting the Falkland Islands, CMO Dr. Roger Diggle comments that the "...causation of depression is multifactorial, but it is clear that loneliness, money worries and the future of agriculture are major factors in Camp."

He adds, "Small farms are often run by husband and wife teams and this has the effect that any problems in the farm are brought back to the marriage and vice versa. Relatively minor medical problems can cause major disruption to the working of a farm at key times of the year."

He recommends that "Government should develop policies to gain a clearer understanding of the cause of depression within the Falklands, and develop strategies for preventing and treating depression."

The "difficult and emotive issue" of underage sex is also debated in the document. Dr. Diggle comments that "...a high proportion of teenagers are using contraception and therefore, one presumes, are sexually active."

He says the proportion of teenagers using contraception appears to be roughly double that of the UK, but qualifies this saying. "...our figures are likely to be more accurate than the UK's as there is only one source of contraception in the Islands, whereas in the UK there are many different sources, thus making collation of figures more difficult."

The report claims that smoking and alcohol abuse are major health factors within the Falkland Islands: "Approximately 25-30% of nonsurgical admissions have alcohol misuse as a significant factor leading to admission. In the region of 80% of child abuse/neglect cases alcohol is a major factor."

Dr. Diggle recommends. "Government should enforce the nosmoking policy it has adopted and should give priority to schemes to minimise smoking and alcohol abuse."

On a more positive note Dr. Diggle says, "I believe we are the first country in the world to offer a truly effective screening programme for colorectal cancer to all our population," and "...child health is generally excellent."

It also notes:

•The focus of the Health and Social Services Department must now be directed to improving primary care in the same way that we improved secondary care,

 Government should adopt policies that encourage health education.

• Government should continue to develop policies to improve the quality of life of the elderly population

Cynic - A man who knows the price of everything and the value of nothing (Lady Windemere's Fan. Oscar Wilde)

NO I'm not really suggesting Oscar Wilde had a downer on cynicism. Wasn't he the bloke who declared that work was, "... the curse of the drinking classes," and "...the one duty we owe history is to rewrite it'

When it came to cynicism Oscar was King. (Or Queen of you will). But admire his work as I do, outside of the arts I am not inclined to be very impressed by the self declared cynic. In fact I have long suspected

that the Falklands is a little over-blessed with sceptics.

So I was interested, surprised even, to hear that quite a few campers were quite taken with the idea of "Falklands Branding" (see right) - a concept I envisaged would raise more eyebrows than a plastic surgeon's

But then again, while my own view of the project, prior to an interview with James King, could only be described as pessimistic, less than half an hour later I had to concede the idea sounded almost plausible.

Why? Firstly because there were no arrogant claims of guaranteed success. Convincing the world that we aim to be cleaner and greener than most other countries would take time, not to mention careful planning and marketing and a combined effort on the part of Islanders - and we all know how difficult combined efforts are!

Secondly because the concept was not, as I first assumed, just about packaging up some bottled water with a fancy logo on it. It apparently involves greater emphasis on ecologically sensitive tourism, agricultural diversification, maintaining our responsible attitude to the fishery and

If Falklands branding is even greater motivation for us to develop in such positive directions then I am not going to be the one to rubbish it.

If all goes according to plan it could help some of our farmers out of a hole - it could boost our economy by further encouraging tourism - it just might turn out to be the best thing we've ever done

And anyway there's no getting away from it, I like the idea of a change of image for the Islands. "Cleanest and Greenest?" Preferable to

"miserable and bleak."

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Cleanest and greenest? Early days for Falklands branding

IS it practical and is it acceptable?

These are the questions being asked of the aim to create a Falklands quality mark that can be used to help sell our products and services around the world

James King of Marketing Principals International Limited, who has been hired by FIDC to investigate the concept is currently travelling around the Islands seeking feedback and answering questions

about the project.

Talking to *Penguin News*, Mr King said. "The project is still at the early stages of development." He added. "The project arose because of the continued long term slump in wool prices. While revenues from the fishery produce a healthy income for the islands. there is a need to broaden the islands' economic base into other profitable activities.

He explained that the key issue is "_what can the islands produce (products or services) that can be sold for a premium price that more than compensates for the Falklands distance from markets?

Mr King explained that initially it was thought the answer lay simply in organic products, but these are now so common in supermarkets their value has dropped. However, he believes that since demand for organic produce is growing fast people will be looking for the best

He also foresees that buyers will start to question the credentials of organic producers," and this is where the Falklands comes in. Buyers are sometimes suspicious of countries' claims to being clean and

Combine the two and you have an opportunity for the Falklands to make the claim that it is the "cleanest and greenest" country in the world.

"If adopted, this claim will provide a hugely powerful platform from which to develop and sell Falklandsproduceinto narrow high value market sectors worldwide,"

says Mr King.

He sees opportunities for farmers and business to not only produce new products but become more involved in "...value-adding activities such as further-process-

ing, packaging, sales and distribu-

This is where the branding device comes in, which distinguishes ...the very best products produced in the islands.

Mr King suggests a branding panel comprising members of the Rural Business Association, FIDC and business representatives who would re-certify annually

Like France and New Zealand the Falklandscould push their quality mark around the world, taking advantage of free publicity from journalists who are certain to want to investigate the "cleanest and greenest"elaim, indicatedMr King.

He admits this won't come with-out a price. Why? Because, he explained, to make it believable the Falklandsneed to diversify agriculture into new products, maintain the sustainable fishery, develop tourism sensitively, manage the environment and find ways of living clean and green.

He says that it is also vital that the brand device only be attached to products that the buyer is willing to pay a premium for, and is well promoted into "niche" market

sectors.

Mr King claims market research says buyers are "strongly supportive" of the initiative, but he emphasises that development should be in careful stages.

At present though he is most interested in what Falkland Islanders have to say on the matter.


Surprise letter for Year 3

Abattoir operations manager appointed

hazards such as cross winds on roads, wind chill for sheep and damage to buildings."

The team will remain in the Islands until early December and will make two more visits next year before the work is completed.

The research team currently in the Islands comprises nine members and on Wednesday Professor Mobbs and Dr. Samantha Annold took the time to explain the project to members of Year 10 at the Community School.

Swasie's Falklands push

CHARITY crusader Ron 'Swasie' Turner left the Islands this week, having achieved the challenge of a lifetime.

Swasie successfully completed the 72 mile 'yomp' from Port San Carlos to Stanley, the route chosen by 3 Para in 1982, powered only by his own strength in his "ordinary, standard issue Lomax wheelchair."

Earlier this year Swasie completed the 1.000 mile journey from John O'Groats to Lands End, raising £15,000 for the Clatterbridge Cancer Gene Appeal and a Fire Service charity. Swasie's motivation for undertaking such feats of stamina stems from the loss of his beloved wife Marje to cancer three years ago.

During his arduous UK journey, Swasie met a Falklands veteran who suggested to him the ultimate challenge would be to retrace the route taken by 3 Para in 1982. However the soldier deemed the task as impossible for someone in a wheelchair. After hearing this, Swasie says he, "...dwelt on it then got in contact with Denzil Connick of SAMA82," to see how the task could be undertaken.

During the same journey. Swasie also met fire fighter Richard Helleur, another Falklands veteran. According to Swasie, the two "clicked" and have been close friends since. Richard was the obvious candidate to accompany Swasie to the Falklands for his yomp and kept Swasie's spirits high in the face of adversity.

With generous financial assistance from Mr John Wilmott of wheelchair producers Lomax (a major financier of Swasie's achievements) and the Falkland Islands Government, the two found themselves winging their way to the Is-

lands.

Swasie spoke of his shock when he realised the true ferocity of the 72 mile task ahead of him: "When Terry Peck drove us to Port San Carlos. I was absolutely mortified. I couldn't believe the hills and the tracks I was going to have to negotiate. However on the following day when we set out. I knew there was no way I was not going to do it. I was quite prepared to literally crawl up on my belly and drag my chair up the hills."

The physical stress on Swasie took its toll during the yomp but he remained upbeat. He said. I did six hours solid pushing each day. I paid a high price in as much as my hands started to tear and they did bleed quite a lot. These hills were not only hills but some were almost vertical, the tracks were horrendous to negotiate.

"My tyres have chunks out of them, which illustrates what it did to my hands.

"I fell out of my chair twice and I've got a couple of chunks out of my leg but that's par for the course."

Although beginning their yomp two days behind schedule (due to a Tristar delay). Swasie and Richard finished two days ahead, stopping four miles short of Stanley. The pair averaged a distance of approximately 17.5 miles per day. The final four miles were completed on November 11, finishing up at the 1982 Memorial at 11.00am, in time to lay a wreath.

To date approximately £400 has been raised from Swasie's efforts (including a £90 donation from the Royal Falkland Islands Police). The funds will be split evenly between the Clatterbridge Cancer Gene Appeal and SAMA82.

FIG "worst discriminator"

I AM surprised by the Attorney General's reminder that discrimination is illegal (PN: 27th October)

FIG is one of the worst discriminators. Over the last year I have been refused medical treatment and help with my Mse course, both on the grounds that such help/treatment was reserved for local residents.

I accept there may be a genuine financial need to restrict education and medical treatment, but lets not brag about equality which does not exist.

Following a disagreement with FIG over seabird protection. I firmly believe Host my job as Conservation Officer for "drawing too much attention to oiled birds." and was arrested on the basis of evidence which was false. (The official explanation was administrative error).

My wife and her 10 year old boy were threatened and harassed until they were forced to leave the Falklands, and complaints against the officials responsible have been ignored

FIG drafted new legislation last year which has stopped me conducting seabird mortality research, despite having private funding and the landowners permission. I have been told I need new permits to conduct commercial activities, such as the Falklands Network web site, and my employment status has been changed by another "new law".

When I began employment with FIG in 1997, it was on the understanding that government employment provided secure residency status, unless my work was poor

or 1 committed a crime. On this basis I built my house, established my business, and made a home for my family. My employers (FIG) have now changed the law so that government employees can only work three years without requiring a residency permit.

My Permanent Residency Permit has just been refused on the grounds that I, "...do not possess a knowledge or skill of which the Falklandsare in need." Nevermind my penguin research which is clearly of no interest to FIG, or the letter written by the Chief Executive in 1993 inviting me to settle in the Falklands because of my knowledge and skills, or my work in the power station, or my qualifications prior to becoming a biologist, or the seabird training program I run for Chilean government employees, or the fact that I am an accredited Falklands tour guide.

What really sucks is that FIG do not even know what knowledge or skills I possess, because they never asked. The application form makes no mention of knowledge or skills. When I asked the Attorney General (who for some reason is handling my residency) how FIG assessed my knowledge or skills without ever enquiring what they were, he told me he was not prepared to discuss the matter.

There is no appeal process, and no right to present my case other than by taking FIG to the Supreme Court. This is the Attorney General's equality.

"MEDIA Consultant" Scott's unfortunate account of his travel problems (P/N last week) are in my view, out of order

I am ready to be corrected but my understanding is that numerous enterprising people connected with tourism do not base their operations too greatly around the RAF service and its limited civilian seat availability.

When he travelled here before I wonder if he journeyed via Chile. If he had travelled on the Tristar he would have known the procedures, which have changed little, but if anything, for the better. As civilians, we enjoy an unusual privilege.

The Falklands airbridge is given proportionate priority in accordance with commitments elsewhere, and the passenger Tri-Stars are kept pretty busy.

It sounds as if "Damian" was exhibiting gremlins again: these invariably last just over crew duty hours by which time meteorological or second crew time, or whatever, may have begun to play a part, as well as destination times.

Inevitably this can lead to a full 24 hour delay in order to maintain the full chain of organisation connected with each flight. I note the remarks about the poor communication about the situation, and feel that if things were as bad as stated, then this was unusual.

However, it is a military organisation, therefore travel is done military fashion, on a need-to-know basis. You rush to join a queue and once checked in you are effectively self-loading freight.

On balance, for your (or in this case, someoneelse's) money, you get to travel 8000 miles in 18 hours - usually with no change of plane or airline and with a degree of safety unequalled in the civilian airline world.

You are afforded greater comfort than cheaper airlines, even on the freighterarframes, and in the case of residents a greater than usual luggage allowance.

Bearing in mind he was only coming for 11 days, only giving it 19 hours before spitting his dummy sounds like he did not really want to come anyway. and we can guess how the migraines get started!

To then chronicle details of rudeness in a paper whose staff he said he would be training, leaves me wondering what on earth our media needs him for? (In spite of any shortcomings.)



South Georgia "scare" report rejected as "Rubbish"

SUGGESTION that the withdrawal of British troops from South Georgia signals encouragement to hard-line Argentines seeking sovereignty over the Falkland Islands has been categorically rejected by the British Government.

A Ministry of Defence spokesman has re-assured Islanders, in a statement to Mercopress, insisting that, "The United Kingdom's commitment to the Falkland Islands is as robust. strong and determined as ever.

The spokesman declared There is no question of our scaling down our commitment to defend the rights of the Islanders, as the Prime Minister has reiterated time and time again

He was reacting to a "scare" story in Britain's biggest circulation daily newspaper, headlined Troops Quit Island that Sparked War - UK sends out wrong signal on Falklands" The article, in the Sun newspaper, says, "Britain is pulling its troops out of the remote island which triggered the Falklands War The military base on South Georgia will close and the twenty Royal Marines and Royal Engineers will be redeployed elsewhere.

The Sun says: "There are fears the moves could send the wrong signals to hardliners in Argentina who still want the Falklands for themselves

The newspaper quotes its military adviser, Major General Ken Perkins, as declaring: removal of the few British troops is a clear signal we no longer have the capability to defend it, and a clear invitation to those in Argentina who still hanker after British possessions in the South Atlantic. The retreat from South Georgia suggests that (the British armed forces) are now at breaking

The Ministry of Defence dismisses this as "rubbish." What the Sun announces as an "exclusive" revelation, was in fact announced in the British Parliament more than two years ago, in September, 1998.

The Ministry of Defence felt it was no longer justified in keeping such a small military detachment on South Georgia, and that a larger presence of British Antarctic Survey scientists was a more practical use of manpower.

The Sun also gets its facts wrong on what happened on South Georgia in 1982. It says: "The Argentines invaded South Georgia when it was 'protected' by only a handful of scientists, then swept into the Falkland Islands.

Mercopress Correspondent Harold Briley, who reported on the conflict at the time, writes: "This ignores completely the gallant defence mounted against an invading force of 100 Argentines by a platoon of only 22 Royal Marines led by Lieutenant Keith Mills, who shot down two helicopters, killed a landing party. and scored as many as 1.275 hits with machine gun fire and anti-tank shells on the Argentine corvette. Guerrico". Both Lieutenant Mills and his second in command. Sergeant Peter Leach were awarded medals for gallantry

The Sun report says the only Royal Navy warship in the area is a small patrol vessel, HMS Dumbarton Castle. This neglects the regular South Atlantic assignment of the Royal Navy ice patrol HMS Endurance, occasional visits by a larger frigate, and secret South Atlantic patrols by

submarines

Nor does the article mention the 1,600 garrison on land, and the swift means of reinforcement by way of Ascension Island and Mount Pleasant Airport.

Sealord and Pesel confirm deal

SEALORD'S chief executive, Phil Lough, has announced that their global organisation has entered into a partnership with a long-established Argentine fishing company, the Pesel Group and its principal Alfredo C Pott. (See FIS Hot News 15 May)

This," said Mr Lough, "offers advantages for both partners. We specialise in making high quality value added products from deepsea fish in particular hoki. And through a network of global joint ventures with companies we can use the skills gained in New Zealand waters to develop fisheries overseas. Mr Lough said that the 50% partnership with Pesel gave Sealord access to a significant additional resource of hoki, squid and hake and four vessels fishing in Argentinean waters. "Hoki resources there are similar in size to those found off the New Zealand coast.

Mr Lough said the Argentine hoki, squid and hake would be marketed through Sealord's worldwide network to food, service and retail customers. Pesel would also be actively involved in marketing the product.

The partnership with Pesel is Sealord's second venture in South America. Sealord is a shareholder in a Chilean company that owns about 36% of Chile's licences for orange roughy

Veterans Pilgrimage Plans and Fund-Raising Go Ahead for 2002

THREE hundred British veterans who fought in 1982 Falklands Conflict are expected to join a nostalgic pilgrimage back to the Islands to mark the twentieth anniversary in 2002.

The South Atlantic Medal Association, known as SAMA '82 , are now confident they can go ahead with this ambitious project for which they have launched a fund-raising campaign with a target of £350-thousand pounds (more than 500-thousand dollars). Hiring a British Airways jumbo jet is estimated to cost £340-thousand pounds.

SAMA Secretary Denzil Connick, a paratrooper who was severely wounded and lost a leg in the conflict, told Mercopress: " have made significant progress in funding the project". They have been promised generous financial help by the famous comedian, Jim Davidson, a dedicated fund-raiser and entertainer for the armed

The pilgrimage is planned for November, later in the year than the conflict, to take advantage of better summer weather. There will be a crowded programme including visits to battle sites, wreath-laying on land and at sea, and remembrance services in Stanley Cathedral and elsewhere in tribute to the men who lost their lives. For many of the three hundred veterans, it will be their first time back in the Islands. They are looking forward to a reunion with Islanders who will have an opportunity to express

face-to-face the gratitude they have always shown to men of the Task Force who liberated them. Hospitable Islanders are expected to invite the veterans to stay with them in their homes, as they did after the conflict.

Legless Veteran's Parachute Jumps

Another courageous veteran who has been busy raising money for the pilgrimage with dare-devil parachute jumps is John Jones, a former Welsh Guards Lance Sergeant, who lost both legs in a missile accident on Stanley airfield, having survived the horrors of the Sir Galahad bombing in which thirty of his comrades died and many more were wounded.

There is unfinished business to be completed," he says. "I am going back to say goodbye to my friends and to tell them they are not forgotten. Even though I've no legs, I'm jumping for my old Guards

pals John, aged 43, originally from North Wales, served alongside his father, Sgt Major Eirwyn Jones, and brother Lance Sergeant Geraint Jones in the Welsh Guards although he was the only one to go to the Falklands. FULL IMF SUPPORT FOR

ARGENTINA
THE International Monetary Fund openly supported the package of economic measures announced last Friday evening by president Fernando De la Rua to bolster the Argentine economy and ease fears among foreign investors holding Argentine bonds.

In a national broadcast, president De la Rúa underlined that Argentina will honour all its debts, further advance deregulations in the health and social security systems, and anticipated tax cuts as the economy begins to recover.

Mr. De la Rúa also indicated that political understanding with Congress and provincial governors to balance the budget was in the making and further measures to overcome the almost two years long Argentine recession

The Argentine president also confirmed his embattled Economy Minister after days of rumours of his possible replacement.

"The commitment of this president, its Minister of the Economy José Machinea and the whole cabinet to fiscal solvency stands as strong as ever," emphasized President De la Rúa.

The speech had a positive reaction from Argentine business and in Washington IMF announced a contingency loan of ten billion US dollars to reinforce the Argentine economic programme and provide an additional thrust to its current sustainable long term growth policies.

This is proof of Argentina's commitment to policies that have been so successful for over a decade." said an official IMF release

Argentina had to pay record risk premium rates this past week. following concerns that the slow Argentine recovery could anticipate trouble tapping international money markets, particularly next year when the country needs to refinance 19 billion US dollars of foreign debt.

A sounder local political atmosphere plus international support to Argentina's fiscal solvency commitment is expected to ease volatility in emerging markets.

SHACKLETON TARGETS VINSON PEAK

THIS is the first time Scottish born Brian Shackleton. Antarctica but his passion for mountain climbing will make his goal of reaching the Vinson peak a particularly challenging task given his illustrious name

In a brief interview with the Chilean press in Punta Arenas. Shackleton and Salter said that climbing the Vinson mountain was not particularly difficult, but weather conditions and freezing temperatures were the main challenges.

Mr. Salter this year reached the top of Kilimanjaro in Africa and McKinlay in North America.

PERU CONFIRMS APRIL ELECTIONS

WITH the legal publication this week in the official gazette. Peruvian presidential and congressional elections are now confirmed for April 8. cutting short Peruvian president Alberto Fujimori's third contentious mandate.

The official announcement should help unblock a country that has practically come to a standstill amid a growing corruption scandal that condemned Fujimori's ten year rule, following the appearance in a leaked video of the President's main advisor bribing an opposition Congress member. The video

video of Vladimiro Montesinos, former Army officer. and spy master of Fujimori's regime, forced the president's decision to resign last September.

Fujimori won a third five year term last May in an election marred by allegations of fraud and vote rigging that apparently engineered by Montesinos.

The president's former ally then fled to Panama but is now back in Peru and in spite of an arrest warrant and Fujimori's attempts to catch him, he's still on the loose apparently under protection from friendly military officers.

Alejandro Toledo head of the opposition who led the protests against Fujimori's third term election and the likeliest winner next April, is also demanding a congressional inquiry into Montesinos who was found to have 50 million US dollars stashed in secret accounts in Swiss

banks

The ten years of Fujimori have been marked by the defeat of the bloodiest guerrilla movement in Latinamerica, an open market and stable economy after years of stagnation but also the worst record in human rights violations.

EUROPE, THREE TIMES THE

Mercosur-European Union Negotiations Committee is currently attempting the approval of common sanitary regulations, that will operate as the legal framework for agricultural trade, the most contentious area between the two blocks

This doesn't mean we'll reach tariff agreements in the near future. but sooner or later we'll find the equilibrium point," underlined Mr. Patten adding that its' " important we don't squander the thrust of the negotiations.

Mr. Patten indicated that Mercosur was anxious to penetrate Europe's 600 million market but "we must first agree on quality and sanitary controls, which will also mean a greater competitiveness for the region's production'

Regarding the Free Trade Association of the Americas (FTAA) negotiations. Mr Patten said he believed they would not interfere with the European Union-Mercosur agreements, since FTAA includes 34 countries. 34 different sets of interests, besides the fact that Europe's potential for Mercosur is, "at least three times that of the United States.

"WRONG FISCAL POLICIES" MERCOSUR countries should be reducing taxes and increasing public investment to overcome recession. but they are doing "exactly the opposite," warned Uruguayan Wall Street analyst, Arturo Porcekansky during a conference this week in Montevideo.

Mr. Porcekansky, head of the Emerging Markets Department of the ABN-AMRO New York bank admitted that foreign investors, risk assessment agencies and multilateral organisations such as the IMF, made an incorrect and critical evaluation of the region believing recovery was at full steam, when actually it was just sprouting, and therefore the current "fiscal policies are wrong," and "killed recovery."

"It's essential to respect regional economic cycles and promote public estment," said Mr. Porcekansky. Further on he warned that investment,

Uruguay, in "its current conditions, has no future," adding that if commodity prices have not increased when United States, Europe and Japan are booming, "you can't bet your future on intensive farming or mining.

The new economy demands that

countries provide a "technological ladder" to its population, to promote and create higher added value for goods and services, such as happened with Singapore, indicated the New York analyst

Mr Porcecansky added that the political system's main task is building this "technological ladder," that will help younger generations. "This means reforming education because, for example English and computers have become the world's languages.

25,000 TONNES OF WOOL FOR CHINA

THE Beijing government promised to acquire 25,000 tonnes of Uruguayan industrialised wool and open its market to dairy produce and fresh fruit, following an official visit to China by Uruguayan vice president Luis Hierro

"Uruguay is betting strongly in China, a country with which we have an excellent relation and is one of our foreign policy priorities,"

Mr Hierro in Beijing Mr Hierro said that Uruguay needs the Asian giant as a political and economic reference, in a world that up to now has been dominated by United States and the European

Mr. Hierro said that Uruguay, fully backs Beijing aspiration to become a World Trade Organisation full member," and added that in spite of "...its limited market, Uruguay is an excellent door of access for Chinese long term investments targeted to Mercosur

The Chinese government also committed itself to a more transparent import licencing system to boost bilateral trade and to "authorize Chinese provinces to acquire Uruguayan produce directly.

China has been for the last lifteen years Uruguay's main market for greasy and industrialised wool.

CHILEANS NOT SURPRISED

THE release by the United States government of 16,000 government documents related to events leading to Pinochet's military toppling of elected Socialist president Salvador Allende in September 1973, and the first years of his regime, did not surprise Chilean public opinion.

White House officials said the documents were released following a Clinton order to allow the public to determine whether Washington actions had undermined democracy and human rights in Chile during the mandate of Socialist Allende that ended in a ruthless military coup headed by General Pinochet in September 1973.

Actions approved by the US government during this period aggravated political polarization and affected Chile's long tradition of democratic elections and respect for the constitutional order and the rule of law," said an official statement from the White House.

Documents released prove that the CIA provided secret funds to Chilean opposition parties in the early seventies, weeks before the military coup, to try to undermine the Allende administration. However names of the recipients in the Christian Democratic Party and the Radical party were blacked out
CIA officials have alleged that

the agency did not instigate the coup, but was well aware of the military plotting against president Allende. In Chile political sources said that

the CIA's role was not a surprise, it

AMAZON RAIN FOREST IN

PERIL
AMERICAN universities and a Brazilian environment research center have warned that the Brazilian government's plan to repair and pave four highways could cause irreparable damage in the coming twenty years to the Amazon rain forest.

With funding from the federal government under the program "Advance Brazil," 3,500 kilometers of roads in four states will be developed, but this could have a devastating impact for 28 to 42% of the forest's four million square kilometers, according to excerpts published in the Brazilian press.

Researchers believe that once roads are finished, loggers and farmers will swamp onto untouched vegetation, speeding deforestation and soil erosion

Apparently the 40 billion US dollars plan also includes building dams for electricity generation and irrigation.

The document was prepared by scientists form the Oregon and Michigan States universities and the respected Brazilian National Institute of Amazon Research.

INTERNET AND MAGALLANES THE optic fibre project that will

give Chile access to a wider hand and faster Internet does not include the extreme south of the country in the first stage and this could condemn the area to further delays in fully

integrating a globalised world Carlos Catalán a sociologist expert in Internet and expert in Internet and communications warned Punta Arenas journalists of the imminent decision and its effects on the

Magallanes Region.

Mr. Catalan gave details of the 60 million US dollar fibre optic web project that will connect the whole of Chile and urged local authorities to prevent the region from being left out, stressing that in "advanced countries" governments make sure remote areas are never forgotten.

Internet in education is essential for any country, indicated Mr. Catalan and praised the Chilean's overnment program to install 100,000 computers in school, "but it's not enough compared to the one million Argentina is already implementing.

Mr. Catalán named four main conditions to increase Internet penetration: easy and quick access to computers for all children; flat rate to avoid end of the month surprises; move full ahead with the wide band higher speed and quality Internet; free access to public or private info-centers so the whole population can get in contact with the new technology.

Finally Mr. Catalán revealed that between 20/30,000 Chileans already have access to the new wide band system and suggested government incentives and lesser regulations for

the new technology.

Dr. Edgardo Reinoso Lundstedt speaking to Punta Arenas press said his office had a long experience in maritime litigation, and this kind of "legal demand is actually quite common.

"We're waiting to collect all the information needed from the victims relatives, and I think we'll begin in two weeks time," indicated Dr. Reinoso

Amur went down in the middle of a storm in the Indian Ocean, allegedly operating illegally, and apparently didn't comply with the necessary health and safety regulations.

PILOT WIND ENERGY

THE viability of exploiting wind energy in the Magallanes region, particularly in the Torres del Paine and Cerro Castillo counties is under consideration by a joint committee from the local Magallanes University and the United States Energy Department.

Sergio Núñez from Magallanes and his American counterpart lan Baring-Gould said that although initial costs are high, investments can be recovered in a five years period and the equipment is long lasting.

Mr. Baring-Gould said he was surprised that given the potential for acolic energy in Magallanes. locals had not taken full advantage of this condition.

"Even if natural gas today could be cheaper, oil prices indicate something different," said the American expert.

Mr. Núñez revealed that the University of Magallanes has pilot wind energy projects in several rural

areas with the purpose of providing electricity to local schools.

"With energy for 24 hours school children can now have access to such modern equipments as computers and videos, a complete revolution," said Mr. Nuñez.

The Chilean expert added that Magallanes University is now connected to the aeolic energy data banks of the US Energy Department. "which will enable us to advance in expertise and experience."

PATAGONIAN "PICKETS"

BUSINESSMEN, farmers, transport companies and local residents from Comodoro Rivadavia have decided to cut Patagonia's main highway with pickets if the Argentine Congress finally decides to eliminate the 25% fuel subsidy that benefits Patagonian residents.

The decision was taken after a meeting of thirty different organizations from the city and neighboring areas with an invitation to similar groupings from the provinces of Santa Cruz and Chubut.

"We're going to cut highway 3 for as long as necessary if the fuel subsidy for Patagonia is eliminated." said Carlos Robledo head of Comodoro's taxi cooperative, who anticipated that a common protest

strategy was being coordinated with other areas of Patagonia.

"We're fed up of politicians words and promises, we're determined to take strong action," underlined Mr. Robledo.

Picketing and road cutting has become a common protest practice in Argentina. The Argentine Congress is currently considering the budget bill that includes a clause eliminating the Patagonia fuel subsidies.

WOOL REPORT for the week ending Friday, November 10

Auctions

Prices were generally lower again in the main wool markets this week. In Australia, the Eastern Market Indicator (EMI) eased three cents on Tuesday, lost eight cents on Wednesday and remained at the same level on Thursday, to close the week down another eleven cents at 718 A cents per kg. In South Africa the Cape Wool Merino Indicator dropped 1.5 percent to end at 2070 SA cents/kg clean.

In New Zealand the Fine Indicator dropped 24 cents to 1605 NZ cents, the Medium Indicator eased 26 cents to 516 NZ cents whilst the Strong Indicator went 3 cents lower to 412 NZ cents.

China

China imported 168,000 tons of wool in the first eight months of this year - which is 69.22 percent up on the same period of last year. The last fortnight's down turn in the world's wool market is largely due to reduced Chinese buying as quotas are filled and shipping dates reached Analysts report that the Chinese interest is still there and the full is generally seen as a temporary one – dependant upon the allocation of further import quotas. (Temporary however is seen by some to extend for as long as after the Chinese New Year celebrations.)

Currencies

The impact of currencies on wool trading is illustrated by 'the Australian currency which has depreciated by 14% since the new season began in July. In United States dollar terms, the price of wool (EMI basis) has gone down from 423 US cents per Kg clean to around 381 US cents (WRWMR). Such currency movements encouraged buying by China and others a month ago.

Agency

With shearing well underway the Agency encourages top quality wool preparation and every effort to minimise dark coloured fibre contamination. The 'watch words' of shearing sheds remain "Quality Control".

The Agency received further speciality wool enquiries seeking news of new season wool. The marketing instructions and bale specifications received to date are received with many thanks.

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



Gastroenteritis in children

GASTROENTERITIS occurs when the guts (intestines) become infected. Many bacteria, viruses and other microbes (germs) can cause it. It can range from a mild upset tummy for a day or two with some mild diarrhoea to severe vomitting and diarrhoea for several days or longer.

What are the symptoms of gastroenteritis?

*Sometimes vomiting is the main symptom. Sometimes it is diarrhoea. Sometimes it is both.

•Crampy pains in the abdomen (tummy) are common. Pains may ease each time some diarrhoea is passed.

•High temperatures (fever) and headaches are common.

If vomiting occurs, it typically lasts a day or so. Diarrhoea often starts after any vomiting and may last several days. Loose motions (stools) can persist for a week or so before a normal pattern returns. See below for symptoms and complications.

How do you get gastroenteritis?

Sometimes it is caused from infected food (food poisoning.) Sometimes it is just 'one of those bugs going about.' Infected water is a cause in some countries.

Good hygiene prevents spread to other people. Children should be helped to wash their hands after going to the toilet. Adults changing babies nappies should wash their hands afterwards.

What is the treatment for gastroenteritis?

Drinks - give the child lots to drink. This is the most important part of treatment. The aim is to avoid dehydration. Even if the child vomits or feels sick it is important to give frequent sips as some fluid will still be absorbed. Ideally, fruit juices should be included as these have some sugar in them. However, any drink is better than none. If the child will only drink their favourite drink then that is fine.

Food and milk feeds - do not starve a child with gastroenteritis. This used to be advised but is now known to be wrong. The child should eat as normally as possible. However if he or she does not want to cat, take milk or breast feed, then that is fine. Drinks are most important and food can wait until the appetite returns. Once vomiting is settling, offer some food or a milk feed every now and then. If the child is old enough for solids then



salty soups (to replace salt lost in diarrhoea) and food high in carbohydrate such as bread, crackers and pasta are best to start with. A returning appetite is a good sign of recovery. A child may vomit if he or she eats too much at first but this should only be a temporary setback if their appetite remains.

Breast fed babies - should continue to breast feed if they will take it. This is in addition to extra drinks if they are advised. Bottle fed babies should be fed with full strength milk if they will take it. Again, this is in addition to extra drinks if advised.

Medicines to stop vomiting or diarrhoea should never be given to young children. They sound attractive remedies but they are unsafe to give to children due to possible complications.

Paracetamol (Calpol, Disprol, etc) is useful to ease fever (high temperatures.) headaches or stomach pains. These symptoms are quite common with gastroenteritis.

Are there any complications?

Most children with gastroenteritis recover quickly. Vomiting usually settles within 1 to 2 days but diarrhoea may last for longer. Dehydration is the most common complication but it is unlikely to occur if the child drinks. Dehydration may be developing if the child drinks little, passes little urine, becomes drowsy with a dry mouth and tongue. See a doctor if you suspect dehydration is developing.

The following symptoms may also indicate a more serious illness:

- Persistent vomiting
- Blood in vomit or diarrhoea
- •Diarrhoea not beginning to settle after several days
- Pains getting worse
- Drowsiness or confusion
- •Infections caught abroad
- See a doctor if these or any other symptoms occur that you are concerned about.

New Zealand Carrot Cake by Elizabeth Villalon

I don't know whether New Zealanders make better carrot cake than the rest of the world but I think it's safer to leave it in the title than to take it out and risk their wrath.

When researching this article in the various travel guides. New Zealand cuisine was not a major selling point to the tourists. The natives enjoy the staple meat and two vegetables diet at home or go out for takeaway fish and chips.

The big redeeming feature was that it could all be washed down with a great big bottle of home-produced wine, with the most marvellous views to accompany it. I might emigrate (one day.)

Ingredients

Cake

3 eggs

175ml oil

2 tsp vanilla essence

55ml soured cream (ordinary cream and Itsp lemon juice. Leave for

15 minutes)

6oz muscovado sugar

6oz soft brown sugar

9oz wholemeal flour

⅓ tsp salt

1tsp nutmeg

2tsp cinnamon

Itsp bicarbonate of soda

Hoz grated carrot

3oz desiccated coconut

Topping

4oz cream cheese

2oz unsalted butter

2oz icing sugar

juice of ½ lemon

Method

Beat together the eggs, oil, essence, cream and the sugars. Add the flour, spices and bicarb. Add the carrot and coconut. Grease and line a deep cake tin. Bake at 300F for 1½ - 2 hours. For the topping, beat all the ingredients together and spread thickly.

SCB Visa - From credit to debit

STANDARD Chartered Bank Visa credit cards currently held by many Falklands residents will become invalid at the end of the year, however customers will be able to apply for the bank's International Visa debit card.

Letters from Bank Manager Keith Biles were sent yesterday to holders of the credit card explaining why the action had been taken and details about the alternative eard.

The letter states that the card will operate against the balances held on the customer's account in the Stanley Branch without a mini-

mum balance

Mr Biles adds "There will be no credit period and all transactions with the card will be debited to your account here shortly after you make the purchase or draw cash."

Mr Biles summarises what he describes as the benefits of the eard to be newly available in the Islands:

• Easy and immediate access to your funds from over 550,000 Visa cash machines in 123 countries, allowing for convenient cash withdrawal in local currency.

The ability to pay for goods and services in over 18 million outlets in 300 countries that wel-

come your Standard Chartered International Visa Debit Card

Approximately 600 residents currently hold the Visa Credit Card.

Although the Visa Credit Card account will close on December 31, balances will be debited to Falk-land Islands accounts on January 8 2001 or if necessary February 8, 2001

Included with the letter to customers will be a debit card brochure and an application form for the new card.

Mr Biles commented to *Penguin News* yesterday that he had "high hopes" for the card.

Court news

Threatening and abusive STANLEY resident June Wade appeared before the Senior Magistrate on Wednesday.

It was alleged that Ms Wade had used threatening, abusive and insulting words towards Mr and Mrs Reginald Anderson.

Ms Wade entered a guilty plea to the charge.

The court heard that on September 29 police had been called to a disturbance at Murray Heights where Ms Wade became abusive towards the police and showed clear

signs that she was drunk.

Defence lawyer Hugh
Ferguson told the court Ms
Wade knew she had, "...overstepped the mark," and had been
drinking but she had been suffering worry over the illness of
her father

Senior Magistrate Keith Watson sentenced Ms Wade to a six month conditional discharge and warned her about the consequences of any similar action.

Drink driving
JOSEPH GWYN CLARKE appeared before three Justices of
the Peace yesterday to face a
charge of drink driving.

The court heard that on Sunday, October 15 police officers on a mobile patrol observed a Landrover which they knew to belong to Mr Clarke being driven around Stanley. Mr Clarke had earlier been observed "skylarking" outside the Globe Tavern and officers understood he had been drinking.

The mobile patrol followed the vehicle along Davis Street and stopped it on the Bypass Road. The driver was identified as Mr Clarke.

A positive roadside breath test was conducted and Mr Clarke was conveyed to Stanley Police Station for further breath analysis, the lower reading from which was 55 micrograms of alcohol in the 100 millilitres of breath analysed.

Mr Clarke received a fine of £100 in addition to £35 prosecution costs and was disqualified from driving for twelve months.

Justice of the Peace, Mrs Mandy McLeod told Mr Clarke he should view the fine as a, "...warning to refrain in future from drink driving."

Discoveries not an extravagance say Police

RUMOURS of extravagant spending on the new Royal Falkland Islands Police vehicles have been challenged by Inspector Len McGill.

Speaking to *Penguin News*. Inspector McGill stated, "The Gran Vitara and Landrover Freelander have been returned to the government vehicle pool and replaced by two bottom of the range Landrover Discoveries.

"Each vehicle cost £20,130 and in that cost for each vehicle is £3,500 worth of police-specification equipment such as lights and horns.

"The only thing different is that they have automatic gearboxes as opposed to manual gear boxes. They are bulk standard Discoveries."

Inspector McGill explained how his department had come to own the new vehicles. "We originally asked for a replacement for the Freelander because it was not a suitable vehi-

cle; we wanted another Vitara. However the Government Vehicle Working Group decided that they wanted to standardise the Government fleet of vehicles and came to us saying they wanted to replace our vehicles with Discoveries.

"Once they have finished their lives with us they will go back into the Government vehicle pool."

The brightly marked vehicles have come under criticism by members of the public. Inspector McGill responded to the criticism saying, "They are slandard Police markings applied as part of the £3,500 package. By making them highly visible anyone who thinks we're hiding around corners will be wrong."

IF, as indicated by Dr. Diggle's recent health paper, the Falklands really is teetering over a deep, dark pit of depression then thankfully there glimmered a small but significant pool of light last week.

MSL intro' proposed

THE re-introduction of the medical services levy was recommended to a meeting of the Health and Medical Services Committee this week by the Director of Health Services Derek Muhl

In a paper presented to the committee he gave the reasoning behind the recommendation as "...increased and increasing pressure on the budget for medical treatment overseas and the ongoing need to review the services for which charges should be made."

He writes, "Currently charges are made for eye tests to those individuals who wish to be examined more frequently than the guidelines laid down.... and for spectacles over a certain value. No other charges are made for health services but there is a lack of logic in charges being made, in particular circumstances for eye examinations and spectacles but not, for example, for hearing tests and hearing aids."

Some within the community are unhappy at having to pay for some eye tests he notes, and this is despite the free entitlement within approved guidelines; individuals are also unhappy at having to pay for spectacles even though a good range of free frames is available. Mr Muhl believes that extra charges would lead to more complaints.

He also points out the difficulties regarding who is and who is not entitled to free medical treatment, explaining that a medical services levy could simplify this: "... those who pay are entitled, those who do not pay are not entitled, subject to a minimum qualifying period for non-emergency treatment"

Mr Muhl notes"....considerable abuse of the dental services, typified by individuals who never attend for routine examinations but demand an emergency appointment whenever the need arises... There is also considerable cosmetic and restorative work being undertaken on individuals with very poor oral health who ignore professional advice but expect expensive work to be repeated whenever necessary."

Rather than introduce charges, said Mr Muhl, "An alternative approach would be for all dental

treatment to be free, on the basis of agreed protocols e.g. that emergency appointments are not available and expensive crowns and bridges are not provided to those who do not attend routine appointments.

"The only basis upon which charges might be made, is to individuals who fail to keep appointments without any notification, thus wasting valuable time which could otherwise be utilised on other patients."

Final recommendations were:

- ●That the medical services levy be reintroduced on an employee only basis and collected through the income tax system;
- That a minimum qualifying period of six months should be applied for non-emergency and routine treatments and that the entitlement of non-tax paying family members/dependents/children be clarified;
- ●That the current arrangements for eye tests and spectacles be maintained, that is the previously agreed ExCo policy on free spectables up to a given value and free eye tests at a given frequency be maintained:
- I hat this approach be extended to other examinations;
- That protocols to cover dental services and other appropriate treatments should be developed.

Extra staff for pharmacy

THE addition of a second member of staff for the Pharmacy Department was proposed at a meeting of the Health and Medical Services Committee this week.

A paper on the subject noted. "It is becoming increasingly evident that the level of service provided by the Pharmacy Department at the KEMH cannot continue at its present level - never mind expand without the addition of one full time post."

An extra staff member would mean longer opening hours for the public. At present the pharmacy only opens to the public for two hours during both moming and afternoon clinics.

It would also mean an expansion of the pharmacy role to include some 'over the counter' supplies.

North Falklands Basin: Seismic contract for Veritas

VERITAS, a geophysical services company have been awarded a contract to acquire 2000km of 2D seismic data in the North Falkland Basin.

The company received the contract from IPC/Sodra Petroleum, operators of a production licence for Tranche F along with partners Desire Petroleum.

Veritas will deploy their vessel R/V New Venture which is currently surveying in Mauritanian waters off West Africa.

The new venture plans to start surveying in the North Falkland basin in late December.

According to a press release from the Department of Mineral Resources, "The Falkland Islands Government welcomes investment that companies are making to acquire new infill data that will add to the geological understanding of the area."

New policy on redundancies A NEW policy on redundancies

A NEW policy on redundancies within Government. "... will be applied evenhandedly" claimed Councillor Norma Edwards this week.

At a public meeting on Tuesday evening Councillor Edwards explained that the policy which was approved in late October by Executive Council "Lis an improvement on the previous policy." and includes "a long period of consultation"

She commented, however, that the Falkland Islands Government preferred to place individuals in other government posts rather than make them redundant.

Chief Executive Michael Blanch confirmed both of the councillor's points, saying the system was more "deliberative" and adding that redundancy was costly thus it was preferred that people should be re-trained and placed elsewhere within the public service.

Tarmac shortage

THE shortage of materials for the Town Hall car park was caused by a breakdown to the ship carrying the materials to the Islands, said the Chief Executive on Tuesday.

He said there had not been enough material in stock to cover the shortfall caused by the vessel's delay

The government officer in charge of ordering such materials has now made changes to ordering policies so that this will not happen again said Dr. Blanch.

Posts not advertised

COUNCILLORS were asked this week why contracts held by government officers were sometimes renewed without being advertised locally.

Councillor Summers, responding to the question said a "degree of practicality" was used in Human Resources and Customs. He said if no one was obviously available locally then a contract extension request was put to ExCo.

Football season kicks off

THE football season was greeted by a cold blustery day with the odd wintry shower thrown in.

As in the past couple of seasons, the first day saw four teams in action. Before kick-off in both games, the players gathered around the centre circle for one minute's silence to remember Tom Perry who sadly passed away recently.

The first game of the day saw the Sulivan Over 30's play last year's champions, the Kelper Store Celtics. The Celtics lined up with a very similar squad to last season with the notable addition of Jimmy Curtis and Chris Eynon.

The Over 30's introduced three new players to the league. Steve Johnston, James Webb and Phil Boswell.

It was one of the Sulivan debutantes. Webb, who had the first clear chance of the match, however the Celtics opened the scoring in the 24th minute.

Mitchell handled the ball in the area and Curtis sent keeper Smith the wrong way to score the resultant penalty.

The Celtics scored again in the 43rd minute; this time good work on the right from Aldridge allowed him to cross perfectly for Curtis to bravely head home under pressure.

Second prize in the raffle is a choice of conservation fleece and





AG answers Bingham From one who was there

I AM writing in reply to Mr Bingham's letter published in the Penguin News last week. I wish to answer all the points he made.

Mr Bingham and his wife were refused medical treatment free of charge of a kind which is only available overseas, and which is very expensive, because Executive Council had decided that it should only be made available at Government's expense to persons on the Electoral Roll. Even if successful, the treatment does not improve a person's general health.

As he says. Mr Bingham was also refused Government funding for proposed MSc studies. Nobody at all has a right to Falkland Islands Government further education funding and it is not generally made available to adults (such as Mr Bingham) who do not have Falkland Islands status.

Neither case constituted, in my view, unlawful discrimination against Mr Bingham by the Falkland Islands Government. That is because the Constitution says that the Government may lawfully offer benefits to Falkland Islanders which it does not make available to people who are not Falkland Islanders, provided that doing so is "reasonably justifiable in a democratic society".

Mr Bingham complains that he lost his job as Conservation Officer with Falklands Conservation because (he says) he drew too much attention to oiled birds. Falklands Conservation have informed government that in fact Mr Bingham decided not to apply for renewal of his contract as Conservation Officer and instead to apply for the job of Field Officer, Another applicant, whom Falklands Conservation thought was better qualified was appointed to that job. Mr Bingham's allegation that locally found oiled seabirds were oiled due to oil exploration taking place in local waters was complete nonsense. An analysis on behalf of the Government of the oil indicated that the characteristics of the oil were different from any oil being used by any local ship or locally based oil rig or oil rig supply vessel. There was every indication that the oil must have been discharged by a passing vessel

Mr Bingham was not, as he alleges, arrested on the basis of evidence which was false. He was prosecuted and convicted on the perfectly true basis that he had imported pornographic videos. Mr Bingham pleaded guilty and was convicted.

As far as I am aware, Mr Bingham has never produced any evidence in support of his allegation that "officials" threatened and harassed his wife and her son.

The Conservation of Wildlife and Nature Ordinance 1999 did not prevent Mr Bingham carrying out research into seabird mortality. It meant that he had to obtain a bird ringing licence, which has been granted.

The Immigration Ordinance requires all persons who do not have Falkland Islands status or hold a permanent residence permit to have a work permit if they wish to be employed in any job or carry on any business. This has always been the case, in effect, in relation to private sector employment and all business activities. It now applies to all govemment jobs as well, except that if a person holds a government job which he held on 31 December 1999. he will not need a work permit for that job until I January 2002. So Mr. Bingham will not require a work permit for his job as an engineman at the Power Station until that date.

The letter of 1993 from the Chief Executive which Mr Bingham refers to is. I believe, one of 12 November 1993 which Mr Ronnie Sampson, then the Chief Executive of the Falkland Islands Government, wrote to the Manager of the Stanley branch of the Standard Chartered Bank with a view to persuading the Bank to help Mr Bingham finance a house purchase. The Bank would then ordinarily only do that for people who had the right to remain in the Falkland Islands permanently.

To assist Mr Bingham, the Executive Council later decided to give special permission to him to buy a plot on the East Stanley Development. The general policy was, and still is, that special permission is necessary if any of those plots are to be available to a person who does not have a permanent right of residence here.

Mr Bingham seems to think that there is something sinister in the fact that I have been dealing with him about his application for a permanent residence permit. His application was handled by Mr King, the Principal Immigration Officer who referred it to the Executive Council. Mr King was away at the time of the decision and the Chief Executive asked me to telephone Mr Bingham. which I did, notify him of the refusal of the application and tell him what his rights were. Mr Bingham asked me to confirm to him in writing the refusal of the application, which I did.

He then telephoned me and asked me to state in writing what Executive Council's reasons for its decision were and I did that. Mr Bingham telephoned me in response to my letter and I was, as he says, unwilling to discuss over the telephone the merits of the Executive Council's decision to refuse his application. I told him that the decision could be challenged in a judicial review proceedings in the Supreme Court. I believe, however, that the Executive Council were fully aware of Mr Bingham's skills and experience but did not believe that the Falklands needed them.

D G lang QC Attorney General I RECENTLY endured the RAF service to the Islands - the journey took a total of four days.

As far as being informed as to why we were delayed, we were told practically nothing.

With the greatest of respect, Nick Pitaluga's comment that David Scott only gave it 19 hours before giving up is a joke!

I spoke with Mr Scott in the departure lounge (after all, we had the initial 19 hours to get to know most people on the flight) and I got the impression that he did very much want to come to the Falklands, having spent much time and effort planning a training course in the Islands and this may have something to do with his justified reaction.

I do appreciate that the Royal Air Force is not accustomed to flying civilians and that we are indeed privileged. I am also aware it is one of the safest airlines in the world, however I think that just a little more consideration given to mothers with babies and the elderly would not go amiss.

Also maybe a smidgen of information as to the cause and time of the delay may help to ease the frustration of people travelling to the lelands

ARTIST James Peck reflects on the preservation of culture and the history that inspires his work

AS far as I know my grandmother was born at Cerritos. One of the shepherd's houses on the north side of Goose Green, entrance to plains of Lafonia.

She spoke of Orqueta House too but I am sure it was Cerritos.

It's important to me that she was born in the Camp. It's not something rare or fantastic - it's simply that was the way of the Islands.

It has given me my sense of history and let me reflect on what was the normal ways of our ancestors. How the life was like, how does it more importantly relate to the way life is like now, especially in the last five to ten years; as things have changed so much.

Sometimes it seems forgotten, as I think of my grandmother who always held out some hope of returning to the camp, to what she knew and loved and to what I now idealise and romanticise about.

We have these monuments to our ancestors physically still around us.

I am not the sort of person who could go out into a winter snow-storm without gloves and work till I was blue in the face without conversation, without music. Like Willie Nelson would sing, a world without a song is not much of a world.

My sense of history

And Charles Darwin was never much impressed with the patagonic wind swept emptiness neither

Sometimes it is not a very romantic reality, but it gives my painting, my life, a sense of history and belonging.

Maybe we don't need to know about our past to give us some line on the future - but I think we should be aware of this delicate history as it becomes pretty frayed at the edges.

It's not some nationalistic dogma that I'm caught up in, I've never wanted that. Simply we possess a fragile culture that may not exist any more soon because of people's desire to progress.

The preservation of culture should never be trivialised or just left to take care of itself - what will there be left to value, what base to return to? I remember a British soldier saying to a detachment of infantry on a ship that sailed between Ascension and the Islands just after the conflict. "Get out into the camp, that's the real Falklands."

At the time I had no real idea what he was on about but now it's quite obvious.

Without the camp we have no culture really we can call our own

First Commando Challenge victory for FIDF funds through sponsorship for the 82





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EXERCISE Commando Challenge mand tasks were established at strate-Falklands Patrol, a military skills competition hosted by the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) which took place last Friday and Saturday, resulted in a first time victory for the local Commando Challenge is a demand-

ing exercise. The route chosen is based on the epic yomp by 45 Commando Royal Marines from Port San Carlos to Stanley in 1982 during Operation Corporate, the liberation of the Falkland Islands from Argentine occupa-

According to Major Marvin Clarke, Officer Commanding FIDF, "Previously the competition has been set over the route from Port San Carlos to Stanley however this year, due to constraints on manpower and time, the competition was run from Teal Inlet to Stanley

The four teams who participated in the competition were the recently arrived Cheshires who are the new Resident Infantry Company (RIC), FIDF, Joint Communications Unit (JCUFI) and the Joint Services Provost and Security Unit (JSPSU.)

Friday morning saw the beginning of the competition, with the RIC leaving Teal Inlet first, at 6 00am, the other teams followed at one and a half hour intervals after the RIC

Major Clarke described the route taken by the teams. "Day one took the teams via checkpoints due East. South up to the Malo Hills, down to the Malo River then down to the Estancia Brook going around the heads of the creeks. Teams were not permitted to use the road or man-made river crossings: to do so would lead to instant team disqualification

"Day one took its toll with JSPSU losing four team members and JCUFI

As in previous years, multiple com-

gic points along the route. This year the tasks were to change a Landrover puncture without a jack (the FIDF technique of ignoring two large planks of wood provided and just lifting the vehicle with their bare hands was most impressive.) build a raft and cross a raging river (under the supervision and eagle eyes of WO2 Hamilton and Sgt Whiteoak from the Explosive Ordnance Disposal Unit), transfer a mass of heavy and awkward equipment from the top of a steep hill, down to a stream, across the stream via a log (without any of the equipment or team members touching the water) and to a vehicle placed approximately 200 metres away in addition to decoding all of the grid references provided for the check points which each team had to

Major Clarke described the second day of the Challenge. "Day two saw some rather sore looking feet hobble towards the start line. The route was to take the teams to Two Sisters (South.) Mt Longdon (Cross.) Wireless Ridge (Cross.) Sapper Hill (Cross) and down to Rookery Bay Range where they were confronted with a two phase shoot

"The original route for day two was to take the teams via the top of Mt Kent and Tumbledown, however it was decided late on day one that these two points should be removed to make the route achievable in the time limit

"Once the teams arrived at Sapper Hill they were then permitted to travel down the Bypass Road to the range On arrival the teams were immediately ushered on to the firing point given a briefing and set about the shooting

In addition to the four competition teams, mother and daughter team Trudi and Felicity Clarke walked the entire route for charity and were joined by Tracey Clarke on day two.

Focus on Latin America: unprecedented British television coverage

UNPRECEDENTED television documentary coverage of Latin America by British television is breaking the normal mould of neglect of that part of the world, helping to dispel widespread ignorance of its geography and history and inviting new interest and knowledge

Except for the sensational news aspects of the Falklands Conflict and, more recently, the arrest of ex-President Pinochet of Chile, there has not been so much concentration on South America. This time the programmes are more general and varied in their coverage.

The BBC has embarked upon what is probably its most ambitious Latin American project ever, called *Indes to Amazon*, a six-part series of 50-minute programmes, which reviewers call a, "wildlife spectacular an exhibitaring, fascinating, eye-opening account, making handsome amends for the relative neglect of South America, travelling its length and breadth to uncover its vast natural riches."

It claims to be the first ever complete television exploration of the landscape and wildlife of South America, which it describes as having the world's longest mountain range, the greatest river, the driest desert, the richest rainforest and the most productive richest seas.

The first episodes have covered how South America broke off millions of years ago from the prehistoric landmass known as Gondwanaland (which then included Africa and Australia), the formation of the Andes, the Amazon and the rainforests, the glaciers of Patagonia, Venezuela's Angel Falls and Chile's Atacama Desert, And it has explained where South America's people and animalsoriginated.

What has been praised as stunning photography has been carried out over a period of year by South American and other expert cameraman on the ground and underwater, and from the air by a United States pilot, Bob Fulton, in a tiny single-engined Cessna aircraft, with cameras strapped to its wins.

The series, which has already won many viewers, has been compiled by the BBC's renowned Natural History Unit at Bristol, which has made previous classics such as the Flight of the Condor about the wildlife of the Andes, and The Voyage of the Beagle deriving from Charles Darwin's travels and discoveries.

Another BBC series, in four parts, sets out to re-discover the Spanish conquests of the Americas

which took place 500 years ago. Called *Conquistadors*, it is accompanied by a book with the same title.

In yet another BBC three-part series dealing with the whole world, entitled *The State of the Planet*, the famous naturalist. Sir David Attenborough, sets out to dispel people's ignorance of the sheer variety of life-forms on the planet, and to warn of the potentially terrifying consequences of the careless damage inflicted by the human race on the world's ecosystems.

In all his fifty years of exploring the natural world. David Attenborough says this tv series has brought him one of the most exciting encounters of his career, in a remote part of the Amazonian rainforest—a tiny monkey with a black head, so rare it has never before been photographed since it was discovered by a scientists in 1992. Its scientific name is callithris nigricens.

The series producer Rupert Barrington, says: "It was very exciting to find this marmoset and amazing to think that there are animals we simply did not know existed until very recently...We wandered through the rainforest playing a CD of marmoset calls for hour after hour to find it. There may be millions of undiscovered species which could all too easily be destroyed."

Coinciding with these programmes is another by Channel Four, called To the Ends of the Earth! Quest for the Lost City, which follows a team of archaeologists searching for traces of ancient Mayan ruins in Guatemala, believed to be the origin of looted pre-Colombian artefacts that turned up in New York in the mid-1960s.

Another intriguing television documentary called Vanished-The Plane that Disappeared. has attempted to unravel the mystery of a British airliner lost without trace over the Andes fifty-three years ago whose remains were discovered earlier this year. A joint BBC-United States team from WGBH Productions in Boston accompanieda gruelling Argentine Army expedition climbing one of the highest mountains in the Andes to the Tupangato Glacier, where parts of the aircraft re-appeared for the first time since it set out on its four-hour flight from Buenos Aires to Santiago on 2nd August, 1947.

The four-engined British South American Airways airliner, called Stardust, developed from the wartime Lancaster bomber, was

carrying a crew of five with an experienced ex-Royal Air Force pilot, and six passengers who, the documentary says, read like a list from an Agatha Christie mystery novel. They included a Palestinian businessman with a valuable diamond sewn into his jacket, a German emigré woman returning to Chile with the ashes of her dead husband, and a British "King's Messenger" carrying secret diplomatic correspondence.

Argentine Air Accident InvestigationBureau experts, using modern scientific methods, came to the conclusion that the crash was caused by a navigation error attributed to one-hundred-mile-anhour (160-kilometre) jet-stream winds at high altitude about which very little was known fifty years

ago. They believe the wreckage was not discovered in a massive search because the impact set off an avalanche which immediately inundated the plane. It was subsequently submerged under the Tupangato Glacier, only to reappear on the surface after it had slid down the mountain for fifty years to the mountain's lower, warmer slopes.

One mystery the experts never did solve was the meaning of the last message radioed by the doomed airliner as it neared Santiago, simply the capital letters reading "S.T.E.N.D.EC". If anyone can solve that mystery, the Argentine air accident experts would like to know

"MAD COW" COULD BENEFIT MERCOSUR

PANIC caused in Europe by the 'mad cow' disease following renewed outbreaks in France, could have favourable financial consequences for natural beef producing countries such as Argentina and Uruguay from Mercosur

According to the Paris weekend press quoting Argentine experts, the "mad cow" disease never existed and "will never appear" in Argentina because cattle is fed on pasture and not with animal protein meals, "the origin of mad cow's disease

However Argentine beef exports to the European Union- 115,000 tonnes in 1999 - are limited by quotas particularly for prime beef, such as the so called "Hilton quota" which is restricted to 28,000 tonnes annu-

Argentina exports 350,000 tonnes per annum and Uruguay 280,000 tonnes and although Argentina has a greater potential, the home market consumes 80% of its production and Uruguay, 45%.

The French press speculates that if the current panic persists and consumers distrust local beef, the European Union will be forced to open its market to natural beef producing countries such as Argentina and Uru-

A BANKER WHO TRUSTS ARGENTINA

IN spite of the political and financial uncertainties, and his colleagues incredulousness, a New York financial expert and head of the Emerging Markets Department in one of Wall Street main banks openly recom-mended the purchase of Argentine debt bonds.

Arturo Porcekansky, a Uruguayan born banker, who recently visited the River Plate, commenting on his proposition indicated that in the end it all comes down to how responsible the political establishment is, and, "when things really get tough, I trust in the common sense of the Argentine political system.

Following the September resignation of Argentine vice president Carlos Alvarez and the Senate bribes scandal, the political uncertainty generated had a direct negative impact in Argentine bonds and exorbitant rates which Argentina had to

pay to renew its debt certificates.

I believe President De la Rúa has the courage to lead. Economy Minister Jose Machinea knows what he's doing and I'm convinced opposition governors will finally reach a reasonable agreement," indicated Mr. Porcekansky adding that the structure of the Argentine debt is better than that of Russia, Brazil and Mexico.

Mr. Porcekansky said his optimism is also based on what he interprets as a new political alliance that is gradually working up around President De la Rúa and there are no doubts now as to the direction of the eco-

nomic policies of the government. However Mr. Porcekansky admits that events are still evolving and other Wall Street analysts could finally be right, but no Argentine politician will be. "playing the lyre while Buenos Aires is on fire," or will want to inherit ashes

"FINANCIAL ARMOUR

PLATING"
MERCOSUR, Mexico, Spain and multilateral financial institutions gave full support to President De la Rua and his economic program, but also urged Argentine opposition governors to sign the federal fiscal agreement because, "...time is running out," for the 20 billion US dollar, time is running financial armour plating," Argen-

tina is expected to receive during 2001

During the recent Panama Iberoamerican summit. Mercosur presidents went out of their way to express their support for Argentina. and Mr. Enrique Iglesias CEO of the powerful Inter-american Development Bank held a private meeting with President De la Rúa requesting a quick "positive message" from Argentina in response to the financial world's confidence in the country's economy

We trust the economy, but time is running out and international cooperation will only materialise after the fiscal agreement is signed," said Mr. Iglesias.

The De la Rua administration is asking for a freeze in provincial expenditure until 2005, but opposition (Peronist) governors basically want to condition education, health and social security outlays to the evolution of the economy.

However. Peronist governors are also reluctant to agree on strictly political reasons, three of them have chances of becoming presidential candidates in 2003, Carlos Ruckauf from Buenos Aires. De la Sota from Córdoba and Carlos Reuteman from Santa Fé, and all three want to make sure potential competitors join in and none stay out.

Besides former president Carlos Menem who leads some of the smaller provinces, has announced his support to the economic program, but has also reminded the current alliance government that,"...it's the same as the one I proposed in 1998 and the Alianza rejected."

RECORD HOLDER JOINS RIVER PLATE FERRY

THE Uruguayan company responsible for the Montevideo/Buenos Aires ferry has incorporated another record breaking catamaran to its sum-

The Tasmanian-built aluminium Catalonia is 91 metres long, and can carry 900 passengers and 260 vehicles at a speed of 42 knots, equivalent to 65 kilometres.

The Catalonia has four Caterpillar turbines, double combustion with virtually no environmental impact and is expected to sail to Buenos Aires from Montevideo in less than three hours.

According to a release from the Buquebus company in Montevideo, Catalonia holds the Hales record for having crossed the North Atlantic, Spain to New York, in three days, nine hours and 55 minutes at a speed of 38 knots. It also holds a second record as the first passenger vessel to travel 1,000 miles in 24 hours.

During northern hemisphere summer months Catalonia ferries passengers between Barcelona and the Baleares Islands, and then across the Mediterranean to Algeciras and Ceuta in North Africa

NEW AIRPORT IN EL

CALAFATE
ARGENTINE authorities last weekend inaugurated El Calafate interna-tional airport in Santa Cruz prov-The airport is considered a vital link for the promotion of Patagonia's tourist industry

Just thirty miles from the re-nowned National Glacier Park, one of Patagonia's spectacular natural marvels and next to Lake Argentino. the modernized airport has a 2,550 metre long and 45 metre wide all weather landing strip.

The total cost of the airport was 28 million US dollars, 21 million provided by the Santa Cruz government and another 7 million by London Supply the company that will manage the air terminal for the next 25

years London Supply also runs the Ushuaia and Punta del Este airports El Calafate, just next to the Chilean border is considered a crucial link in the Patagonia tourist circuit that

includes Peninsula Valdés, the whale and penguin natural reserves, and Ushuaia, the main cruise terminal for crossing to the Antarctic.

Tourism operators estimate that with the new airport, passenger move-ment for the next two years will jump from the current 50,000 to over 200.000.

RELIEF UNTIL DECEMBER UNSURPRISINGLY the US Federal

Reserve decided to leave interest rates unchanged during its last meeting. which came as a relief for international markets particularly in Latinamerica and emerging coun-

However markets sounded disappointed since in the official release the Federal Reserve indicated that although the United States economy seems headed for a soft landing risks of inflation linger, meaning there could be surprises in the next

meeting in December. Federal Reserve has increased the basic rate six times since June '99 - it now stands at 6.5% - with the purpose of slowing the US economy. mainly consumer demand, to avoid a future overheating. And although most indicators of the economy are showing that goal, unemployment remains at a record low of 3.9%, the lowest in three decades, making bankers concerned. Another area of concern is the price of oil, 38% above a year ago, and with no immediate prospects of stabilizing.

No word was mentioned of the current undefined electoral situation in the United States, but it undoubtedly is a factor for markets.

December and Xmas sales therefore will be crucial for any future Fed decisions.

GALICIAN FLEET WAITING

IN spite of Senate ratification of the Argentine Fisheries Emergency Bill, which would enable the Spanish owned freezer fleet to operate under flexible conditions in Argentina's fishing zone, the House of Representatives is still blocking the draft law thus preventing President De la Rúa from keeping his promise to the Galician fishing industry during his recent visit to Spain. According to La Voz de Galicia, the new bill aims to regulate activities of some 60 freezer vessels, mostly Spanish, which are currently banned from operating north of parallel 48° S in the South Atlantic and from catching hubbsi hake.

During his visit to Galicia, President De la Rúa promised to help the Spanish freezer vessels operate in similar conditions as the Argentine fresh fish vessels. Galician fishing companies allege the ban enforced 18 months ago has cost them the equivalent of 450 million US dollars

However the Industry Committee in the Argentine House of Representatives is stalling on the draft bill, under pressure from the fishing indus-try in the province of Buenos Aires.

ARGENTINA COMBATS POACHING

A NEW Strategic Fisheries Plan was presented by Argentine Secretary of Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Food, Antonio Berhongaray and Fisheries Department Director Horacio Rieznik, during the recent meeting of the Federal Fisheries Council that met for two days in Puerto Madryn and Rawson. Patagonia .

The aim of the plan is the sustainable exploitation of resources, giving priority to Argentine companies and helping employment," said Mr. Berhongaray who anticipated that surveillance and monitoring steps will be strengthened to prevent poaching, including the launching of the Monnesat satellite tracking system. The plan also contemplates a maximum annual catch hubsi hake quota of 200,000 tonnes, plus an increase in the number of Argentine jiggers with the purpose of increasing catches during the coming season, "given the surplus 2000 production

The licensing system will also be reviewed, particularly concerning some species that are in need of conserva-

tion practices

Mr. Berhongaray said that to compensate quota restrictions and as an alternative for inland farmers-aquaculture will be vigorously promoted by the Argentine government

Although representatives of the fishing industry were cautious in their reactions to the announcements, most emphasised the fact that the Fededral Fisheries Council for the first time was convened in Patagonia and not in Buenos Aires. "It seems officials want a more direct and fluid communication with the provinces involved in fishing, which in itself is a great step forward," said one of the fisheries businessmen involved in the two days discussions.

SPANISH "COUP" IN BRAZIL

BANCO Santander Central Hispano. BSCH, strengthened its hold in the Brazilian banking system by acquir-ing in public auction Banespa, (Banco do Estado de Sao Paulo), one of the countries main financial institutions belonging to the state of Sao Paulo. BSCII offered 3,55 billion US dollars, almost triple (281%) the runner up's bid from Brazilian bank Itau. Brazil is essential for our business in Latin America, and we have always stated we want a leading position in the market," read an official release from the Spanish bank that also has a strong presence in Argentina, Chile and Uruguay. However and in spite of praise from

Brazilian officials, Citigroup. BankBoston, HBSC and UBS Warburg analysts, who originally were interested in the auction and finally did not participate fearing Banespa's low earnings and future labour dispute,

earnings and little labour dispute, believe that BSCH acted in an "over aggressive" manner. "It's an excessive price," said Bruno Pereira from UBS Warburg in Rio do

FISCAL AGREEMENT IN

ARGENTINA
FOURTEEN opposition provinces
finally reached a "fiscal agreement"
this week with President De la Rúa's administration, opening the way for a 20 billion US dollar "financial armoured plating" that should help Argentina leave behind a year of political and financial frustrations and look ahead to the coming twelve months with renewed ontimism.

Thirteen Peronist provinces and one independent. (plus the eight belonging to the ruling alliance) agreed to freeze expenditure at current levels until 2005, with the only exception of an "emergency clause," which authorises to suspend austerity when faced with a "serious situation."

Provinces are committed to a great effort in such a difficult situation, but when education, public health or security are at risk we can request from the federal government an increase in outlays without endanger-ing the common target of a balanced budget." said Cordoba governor Juan Manuel De la Sota.

The agreement also obliges provincial governments to climinate automatic salary indexing for local government employees while the central government committed itself to help restructure and refinance the provinces' debts.

The vast majority of Argentine provinces suffer from endemic budget deficits and bulging debts. The austerity measures could heighten social tensions, such as road blocking that have become common in some of the poorest areas of the country

The fiscal agreement should give Argentina access to the 20 billion US dollar contingency package, as well as to international private credit at lower interest rates. The 20 billion is in excess of the 17 billion Argentina needs in 2001 to honour its foreign debts

An International Monetary Fund delegation is expected in Buenos Aires next week to iron out details and conditions of the loan.

However the fiscal agreement wasn't enough to stop a 36 hour general strike convened by the powerful workers unions for this coming Thursday and Friday

CHILE WANTS MORE TIME

CHILE formally requested more time to become a full member of Mercosur which was initially planned for December 2002.

According to the Uruguayan Minister of Foreign Affairs Didier Opertti, We need to find a more flexible system so Chile can incorporate itself gradually, not only regarding trade but in other fields.

One of the stumbling blocks for full incorporation is the fact that Chile has a top 9% import tariff while in Mercosur the Common External Tariff is 14%.

Furthermore, Chile has anticipated it will reduce its external tariff to 6% by 2003, while Mercosur is more inclined to consider the Common External Tariff as a bargaining chip in trade negotiations with United States. Europe and the World Trade Organisation.

Auctions

In Australia, the Eastern Market Indicator (EMI) eased four cents on Tuesday, recovered five cents on Wednesday and added another two cents on Thursday, to close the week up three cents at 721 A cents per kg. In South Africa the Cape Wool Merino Indicator dropped 0.5 percent to end at 2060 SA cents/kg clean.

In Britain an auction of relatively coarse Scottish wool saw limited demand with a clearance of about 60 percent and the indicator down 3 pence to 67 pence.

Australian Background


"For finer apparel wool the season is going well, with statistics suggesting that further ahead supplies may be insufficient to prevent a further price rise. A temporary decline in Chinese buying led to a downturn a couple of weeks ago but with Australian offerings temporarily reduced by a flood affecting a wool store the outlook is firmer again." Ref: FT

Currencies

The Australian dollar remains relatively weak trading at about A\$2.74/£ and similarly the New Zealand dollar at about NZ\$3.58/£. The weakness of these currencies materially impacts sterling wool prices and the Falklands farmer's hope must be for sterling to weaken and these dollar currencies to strengthen.

Ear, Ear!

EARS are organs of hearing. They are also part of the mechanism that controls our balance.

Common hearing problems in children

Ear infections - glue ear

Ear infections are common in young children. The child's tubes get blocked and this means that air cannot get into the middle part of the ear. This part of the ear then fills up with fluid which may become a thick glue. This means that the eardrum cannot move and it becomes hard for the child to hear.

Most children with glue ear get better without any treatment and their hearing goes back to normal. Persistent ear infections may require a visit to the Ear Nose and Throat Specialist.

Common hearing problems in adults

Too much ear wax?!

Ear wax only needs to be removed if it is causing symptoms such as dulled hearing.

- Olive oil used for cooking is effective in removing ear wax. You can obtain it from the dispensary.
- Sometimes ears may need to be syringed by a Nurse or Doctor. Before your ears can be syringed you will usually be advised to use ear drops (olive oil) for about five days. This is to soften the wax plug.
- Please don't use objects such as cotton wool buds, they leave behind tiny filaments that can irritate the skin of your ear, they may push wax down onto your eardrum where it can cause damage, and they can increase the amount of wax your ears produce.

Age related hearing loss

Hearing loss is a natural part of the ageing process. More than half the people over 60 have a hearing loss.

Do you find:

- other people seem to mumble rather than speak clearly to you
- people have to repeat things for you several times before you understand what they say
- you have difficulty understanding what is being said in noisy places, such as pubs or restaurants, although other people are managing to have conversations
- it is hard to keep up with the conversation if you are talking in a group
- You find it hard to listen to conversations because you have to concentrate hard
- Other people think your television or music is too loud but you cannot hear it prop-

erly if they turn it down
 You often have difficulty hearing on the telephone

If any of these things sound familiar to you, it is possible that you have a hearing loss.

Noise related hearing loss

Many people have a hearing loss because they have been exposed to noise.

What can damage your ears?

 Loud noises – either exposure to short bursts of very loud noise, or long term exposure to loud noise

How to tell if sound is too loud

- If you cannot talk to people about 2 metres away without shouting, it means that noise levels are dangerous to your hearing
- If you have been in a noisy place and find you cannot hear properly for a while afterwards, or have ringing in your ears, this is a sign that the sound was loud enough to damage your hearing.

When to protect your ears

- Wear ear protectors when you are using noisy equipment such as drills, saws, sanders, or lawnmowers.
- Do not go shooting without the proper sort of ear protectors. Explosive noises can damage your hearing instantly.
- Constant exposure to noise in shearing sheds can damage your hearing, think about wearing hearing protectors.
- A hearing loss does not protect your ears from loud noise
 you should still wear hearing protectors.

What to do if you think you have hearing loss

If you think you have a hearing loss the first thing to do is:

Have a hearing test.

To do this please phone Sue Wilks on 27375, or reception on 27328 for an appointment.

If you have any of the following you should make an appointment to see a GP:

- painful or discharging ears
- dizziness or ringing in your ears
- hearing loss in one ear only
- you are under 55 and have a hearing loss.

Hearing Aids

Hearing aids cannot give you back your normal hearing, but, they can give substantial help to most users. There are many differenttypes of hearing aids, and we try to find one that will suit each persons particular hearing loss and needs. Hearing aids are improving all the time, if you tried one many years ago you will find that they have changed a lot since then!

Will a hearing aid help me?

If a hearing aid is recommended the only way to find out how much help you can get from a hearing aid is to try one.

Other equipment to help a hearing loss.

There are other pieces of equipment that may help with a hearing loss. We can suggest devices that may help you to:

- hear the television without having to turn it up too loud
- hear the radio more easily
- help on the telephone.

Recipes for the Falklands



Queen Victoria's Apple Charlotte by Elizabeth Villalon

I LOVE the description of how to make this so I have included it in full. It is almost like talking to the cook who tells you her favourite method, but it is up to you to make it very much to your own taste of spices and what is available in the way of apples.

This comes from Osbourne House, Isle of Wight where Queen Victoria and Prince Albert spent many happy days. They regarded it as their own home albeit complete with a life sized fort and dolls house! It was the one place where they were not under constant scrutiny as happened at Buckingham Palace where there were so many servants it took five signatures just to get something fixed. Maybe times haven't changed so much!

Method

Peel and core sufficientamounts of good cooking apples to make ¼ pint of pulp. Cut up and cook with 20z butter, stirring all the time until they are sufficiently pulped and contain no lumps.

Remove from heat and stir in sufficient caster sugar to sweeten and spice to flavour (either can be used). Thickly butter the inside of a 1½ pint pie dish. To a heaped tablespoon of caster sugar add ½ a level teaspoon of the spice being used and with ¾ of this well coat the butter lining of the dish.

Remove all crust from sufficient slices of thin bread and butter and cut them into fingers.

With these completely line the sides and bottom of the dish, leaving no spaces between and putting the buttered side to the dish so that the spiced sugar is between two layers of butter. Pour the apple puree into the dish and cover with more fingers of bread and butter, butter side upwards, and again leaving no spaces. Sift the remaining spiced sugar over the top and bake in a moderate oven for approximately ¾ hour.

Executive Council Reports

Under 18s at the bar?

CHANGES to the licensing ordinance approved by Executive Council, may soon mean that under 18s will be allowed at the bar of licensed premises when they are being used for private occasions such as wedding receptions.

In the future under 18s might also be allowed to attend dances or other entertainment where a bar is operated, without, of course, being allowed to purchase or consume allowed.

The proposed changes follow consultation with the public via a discussion document on the subject.

The amendments to the Ordinance will be brought to Legislative Council for debate

The Governor reported that ExCo took the view that licensees should take more care to avoid serving customers who are drunk and making a nuisance of themselves. They also agreed a proposal that the Licensing authority in future might be the Police Committee.

Traffic Ordinance changes

CHANGES to the Road Traffic Ordinance were debated at ExCo on November 23.

Councillors agreed to a proposal from the Attorney General that there should be a consultation exercise about the possible amendment of the Road Traffic Ordinance in relation to public service vehicles and taxis.

They also agreed a recommendation that the Road Traffic Ordinance be amended to overcome the problem of administering a required breath test to someone who has a breathing difficulty. This would involve the taking of samples of blood or urine instead of breath.

Immigration points system

EXECUTIVE Councillors are examining the use of a points system such as those used in New Zealand and Canada to assist in their consideration of applications for permanent residence permits,

A paper prepared by the Government Secretary was discussed at ExCo last Thursday and councillors intend to return to the matter at a future meeting.

ExCo also considered a paper on work permits. This addressed their period of validity and the requirement to advertise vacancies.

One quarter of a million to spare? Not for South Georgia says Cheek

A FINANCIAL breakdown of the civilianisation of South Georgia, as anticipated by the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) drew an unhappy response from Councillor Jan Cheek in her Legislative Council speech last Friday.

Councillor Cheek used her speech to react to a presentation given by BAS Deputy Director Dr. John Dudeney last week.

She stated that she had been

She stated that she had been "disturbed" to discover from the presentation that the original commitment (by the Falklands Government of £250.000 to the South Georgia Government) was anticipated by BAS to be an "ongoing commitment."

She noted that she had originally, "...voted against giving money to the BAS set up in South Georgia," and commented, "I was not aware that we had made that (ongoing) commitment yet and to give my personal view, I have as strong a sentimental attachment to South Georgia than probably anyone around this table, but if as a government we have funds to the level of quarter of a million a year to spare to assist another territory... then let us give it to a territory that has inhabitants that need help."

Councillor Sharon Halford supported Councillor Cheek's comments

During his talk held at the Development Corporation last week Dr. Dudeney presented an anticipated breakdown of the funding of scientific costs and the civilianisation of South Georgia.

The three elements of the breakdown included funds from the Ministry of Defence, the South Georgia Government and the Falkland Islands Government.

It was announced in June of this year that FIG were to contribute one quarter of a million pounds towards the South Georgia civilianisation process.

The impetus behind the gift was reported to have come from a message sent to councillors from the Prime Minister Tony Blair via the former Governor of the Islands Mr Richard Ralph.

Government House First Secretary Mr Russ Jarvis commented at the time that joint science research could take place between the Islands and South Georgia adding. "We are hoping to demonstrate it will be of importance to the Falklands."

When approached by *Penguin News* on Thursday. Government House First Secretary Mr Russ Jarvis declined to comment on Councillor Cheek's statement.

Summers: "SCB don't want to be here and do not care"

COUNCILLOR Mike Summers has publicly expressed annoyance at Standard Chartered Bank's (SCB) decision to discontinue its Visa credit card service.

In Legislative Council last Friday Councillor Summers said he was, "...very disturbed that Standard Chartered Bank is to withdraw yet another service to the Falklands."

He added that it was, "Most unfortunate and it probably does reflect the attitude of the bank to the Falkland Islands.

"I think those of us who have had discussions with senior managers of the bank in the UK from time to time recognise that frankly they do not want to be here and they do not care and I think that this is a manifestation of that.

"If it is not too late then I would like to urge the bank to reconsider withdrawing another facility from its customers."

But Bank Manager Keith Biles, has responded saying that the discontinuation of the service affects all SCB's customers, not just those in the Falkland Islands.

He said the credit card has been withdrawn because, "...following the sale of SCB's consumer finance business in UK, Standard Chartered has discontinued its Sterling Visa credit card."

He confirmed that the debit card would be as readily acceptable worldwide, but the previous delay between use and full payment against a statement will no longer apply.

Mr Biles said, "Contrary to Mr Summers' comments, Standard Chartered has not been withdrawing other services. We will continue to be a strong contributor to business and social life in the Falklands."

IF there has been one change for the good in the Legislature over the past few years it is - if you will excuse the posey jargon - the fast-tracking of the Legislative Council Meetings.

Admittedly my opinion is heavily weighted in favour of terse discourse, not least because of the many many hours *Penguin News* staff have spent trying to make sense of the vague, meandering and sometimes entirely pointless speeches from the less succinct of our councillors.

And before I am charged with committing similar sins in this column, please bear in mind that much as I should enjoy it, the future of the Falk-

lands does not rest on my rhetoric.

Last week's meeting was a good example of this more efficient approach. The clarity of Bills and Questions was enhanced by some searching supplementary questions, and councillors' speeches did not, on the whole, insult the listener with attempts to disguise a lack of substance with waffle and self promotion.

Councillors who did have cogent points to make during their adjournment speeches did not waste time pandering to those their views might upset, and I was particularly impressed by Jan Cheek's hearty attack on individuals or bodies reluctant to adequately fund the Social Services Department.

Her open disapproval of the ongoing financial commitment to South Georgia was also a courageous statement in terms of refusing to smooch British government butt. Because let's face it some of the arguments for the financial donation did just that.*

Yes there is a flow of money into the Islands as a result of BAS personnel passing through, aircraft stopovers and provisioning, but why should there not be? I cannot think of any valid reason why we should give that money back.

No less important, Mike Summers drew our attention to the imbalance that exists between Stanley and some Camp communities with regard to

who bears the cost burden of social backup.

This is an area that has received very little attention so far, but if we really are determined to keep the Camp alive then would it not complement the current practical assistance to farm businesses, if government were also to look into assisting in the improvement of the social aspect of that lifestyle? Presumably this could involve financial incentives to local companies to provide amenities in the camp, or to farmers themselves for the same purpose.

purpose.

Finally in anticipation of grumbles from councillors whose speeches received little or no airing in the paper this week - just because you said it

doesn't make it a story.

*Earlier this year a primary reason for making the quarter of a million donation to South Georgia was reported by a councillor to be a goodwill gesture towards the partnership arrangements that exist between the overseas territories and the UK.'

Observers on all FI longliners?

THE Fisheries Department has announced measures to be taken against the owners and captain of the fishing vessel (FV) Mila in the wake of last month's court action

According to a release from the Fisheries Department, "In the aftermath of the recent prosecution of the Owners and Captain of the FV Mila, the Director of Fisheries has considered what measures should be adopted in accordance with powers available in the High Seas Fishing Ordinance 1995.

Actions taken by the company

•Licences for all high seas areas issued to the FV Mila, except area 41, are revoked (area 41 is the Southwest Atlantic.)

•Manuel Alvarez Gayo and lesus Freire Paredes (Master and Fishing Master respectively of the FV Mila when the offences against The Fishing (CCAMLR) Ordinance 1999 were committed) should not be employed on any Falkland Islands fishing vessel or any vessel licenced for Falkland Islands fishing waters, for a period of at least five years

As a result of the Mila's illegal actions, the Fisheries Department is examining the possible placement of observers on fishing vessels licenced under the High Seas

Fishing Ordinance

The Fisheries release states. "Implementation of this measure may be considered not only for the Mila but all longliners registered in the Falklands, and fishing on the high seas. The general adoption of such a measure requires further consultation and would, ultimately, need to be considered by Executive Council

Eighteen month suspension for Vinall

DR PAUL VINALL has been suspended by the General Medical Council for a period of eighteen months at an Interim Orders Committee Hearing.

The suspension came about as the result of a police investigation in which it is alleged that Dr Vinall committed indecent assaults upon female patients.

FIG U turn cause of confusion

WELL, what a U turn! Who would have thought that a letter in Penguin News could result in changes to my residency and research status.

Has there been a change in the law, or is the law so woolly that it can be interpreted on a day-to-day basis?

On September 1, 2000 Mr Lang phoned me to tell me two things. Firstly that my permanent residency permit had been refused, and secondly that a change in the law meant that I could not remain in government employment for more than three years without a permit. He pointed out that I began work in November 1997, so three years meant November 2000.

I do indeed think it sinister that Mr Lang should deal with this matter. Residency permits are dealt with by the Immigration Department. even in the absence of the Principal Immigration Officer. Notification should also be given in writing, but Mr Lang was reluctant to do so. It is on record that I faxed Mr Lang 4 weeks later, demanding written confirmation which had still not been given.

Mr Lang replied on October 2 confirming Exco's decision. His letter stated that I had three months from the date of the letter to contest the decision in the Supreme Court. That now meant January 2001. Based on this information I put my house and vehicles up for sale, and sold off belongings at the flea market.

Mr Lang now states in Penguin News that I am legally entitled to remain until January 2002. Has the law changed or was I mis-informed? Is January 2002 your final answer, or would you prefer to ask the audience?

Mr Lang also states in Penguin News that my bird-ringing permit has now been granted, eight months after I applied for it. I was told eight months ago that FIG were reluctant to issue the permit because similar work was being done through Falklands Conservation. Following Mr Lang's letter. FIG now claim the permit was issued last month and got "lost in the post." Even if this were true, last month was too late to be of use, which is why I applied for the permit in March. FIG know this perfectly well, because they did the same thing last year. Perhaps the letter notifying me that I wasn't being deported also got lost in the post.

Mr Lang then assures me that ExCo do know what my knowledge and skills are. How? How can they possibly know without asking? The application form does not ask, and no enquiries were ever made. This is an issue which should concern all

residents. If ExCo cannot tell me what my knowledge and skills are, then this cannot be the real reason for refusing my PRP. It should worry all residents if ExCo can make decisions against individuals, and cover up the real motives for their decision. It's a simple question requiring a straight answer. How do ExCo know without

asking?

It should not be forgotten that this problem began in May 1998 when a member of ExCo made accusations of theft against me. ExCo. later admitted that the accusation was untrue, but the nature of the accusation and the identity of the person who made it were withheld. This could happen to anyone who has a disagreement with a councillor

Mr Lang never wastes any opportunity to advertise the only criminal conviction I have ever had. the severity of which was reflected by the £150 fine (less than a speeding offence). He omits to mention that I was then arrested again. Mr Lang dropped the case after the police admitted in writing that the evidence presented during my arrest was a "printout" from the police computer, with the material facts having been accidentally changed.

I got married on February 14, 1999. Two weeks later an Immigration Officer interviewed members of the public suggesting that I was a convicted burglar, even though Interpol had already told them I was not. The result was inevitable. My wife and her 10 year old son arrived from Chile only to be harassed by angry residents who believed I was a burglar. I was spat at in the street, we had abusive phone calls, and my car was filled with petrol. Complaints against a government officer for making threatening and malicious phone calls were never investigated. leven wrote via Registered Mail (Reg No 004419, dated 6/9/99) but my complaint was ignored.

If it was a genuine mistake, then surely FIG would have apologised, and made sure that everyone in the Falklands knew that a mistake had been made. If on the other hand it was the intention to stir up public hatred against me and my family. then it was very successful.

My wife's 10 year old son could not take the harassment and abuse. In school he suffered "your dad's a burglar", "we don't want criminals here". "go back to where you came from". Not surprisingly he went back to Chile to get away from it, and my wife eventually returned to be with him, as any mother would. I now see my wife in Chile once a month, which is lonely and financially crip-

I cling to the Falklands because it is all that keeps my marriage together. I cannot get paid work in Chile, and my wife refuses to go to Britain because she thinks it will be as corrupt as the Falklands. So where do I go when I leave?

All I wanted when I built my house was the right to live and work in the Falklands with my family. My endless dispute stems entirely from FIG's attempts to deny me this right through false allegations, harassment, and attempts to deport me.

Why did FIG grant me "special permission" to build my house, if they won't give me secure residency to offer my family a future in it? Mike Bingham

Who is driving review?

BEFORE the constitutional review became a formal initiative, rumour control indicated that a central aim was to look at the issue of those who were denied right of residence even though their parents were resi-

Obviously our media would be hard pressed to enter the arena of investigative journalism. so where do the facts come from? Public meetings and phone-ins rarely produce facts or informed debate.

Where are the facts that tell us we have such a wealth of political talent, honesty and objectivity that we can sideline the Governor and the Attorney General.

Where are the facts that tell us we have such a wealth of the wise and good that we shall never make a mistake in those we elect and therefore never need advice and support. Where are the facts that tell us that present systems of complaints and appeals are tried and do not work?

Where are the facts that tell us

how a ministerial system will make our councillors more accountable? If councillors become ministers of one, two or three departments each, what happens if their departments do not make the grade? Shall we be sending the ministers to the backbenchers whilst they are replaced by eager colleagues?

Where are the facts that say the Camp will count for much once their votes become insignificant within a single constituency or a

new voting system?

Where are the facts that say we are wrong in not wanting to invest too much power in a single 'tall poppy?" According to circumstances a tall poppy can be an ornamental flower or it can be a weed. neither of which is usually considered a qualification for leadership

Where are the facts that tell us who is truly driving this review and why?

None of these questions mean that there will never be a time for some or all of these proposals but is now the time?

Fibre optic cables not the answer

DURING his visit a couple of weeks ago, MP Ian Bruce suggested that the Falklands should be connected to the outside world by an undersea fibre optic cable (PN, November 10).

Unfortunately the nearest point for connecting into the worlds submarine cable system is Buenos Aires and even they will not be connected fibre optic cable until 2003.

The estimated cost of laying a cable between the Falklands and Argentina is £60-70 million.

Submarine cables are very vulnerable, the 1915 cable to Montevideo lasted only a matter of weeks and last week one of the main cables connecting Australia to the outside world was cut approximately 40 miles from Singapore.

The damage has caused chaos to Australia's Internet subscribers; the cost of repair could be in excess of £100 thousand pounds.

RAF's outstanding record

I AM not surprised that Islanders, with their sense of fairness and balance, answered David Scott's criticisms of the RAF, which, during the Conflict and since, has provided outstanding service to the Falkland Islands.

The RAF does not deliberately delay flights without reason.

Having experience of RAF activity worldwide, as well as of flying with other countries' military forces. I have nothing but praise for the RAF's standards of professionalism and safety, often in difficult and dangerous circumstances in fair weather and in foul.

I recall the camaraderie of the long Hercules journeys, the technical challenge of refuelling in flight, the RAF's rescue of grateful British civilians in the Iranian revolution, and its medivac flights to Uruguay to save a desperately ill baby or a heart attack patient.

David Scott's remarks about "bombing Falkirk rather than the Falklands" and about missing Kosovo targets, ignore the conditions encountered in the Balkans and the complex navigational and flight-refuelling achievements of the 1982 Vulcan bomber attack on Stanley Airport which, whatever its military effectiveness, had devastating impact on Argentine morale.

Safety is paramount and is often the reason for delay on Tri-star and commercial airline flights. I never complain about such delays, having too often stood amongst the scattered debris of crashed aircraft

on remote mountainsides and watched as the bodies and injured are stretchered away.

Inconvenience and time, sharing a room in the Halfway House, and even drinking from a tap, cease to matter when you are dead.

I have found RAF and Royal Navy safety instructions to be impressively inclusive.

Strapped safely in RAF aircraft is a more reassuring experience than flying in the less scrupulous safety standards of some foreign air forces.

And a three-day delay at Brize Norton seems a comparatively short span of time compared with up to three weeks of delay I have encountered in the "mañana" culture of some Latin American airlines, or being on a flight overbooked by treble its capacity of passengers.

I do not know what Media Consultants do, never having met one. But David Scott's petulant outburst appears to neglect a basic rule of fair and balanced journalism, which is to give the target of any criticism the opportunity, prior to publication, to put their case.

I hope Penguin News did so.

Instead of a letter of complaint, the whole episode could have provided a good journalistic story, by enlisting the aid of two of Rudyard Kipling's "stout serving men" whom David Scott ignored.

A right to courtesy

MAY I please comment on two items from the letters page of last week.

Adrian Lowe knows very well that he has not been promised a road up Wireless Ridge. What he was promised was some additional bridges, which were put in almost immediately (one of them protected for his exclusive use to prevent it being ruined by other less thoughtful drivers) and various investigations into what might be practical to help access to a very difficult area. One of these investigations was indeed improvements up Wireless Ridge; unfortunately I am advised that this can only be achieved by hauling heavy loads through the town and up the road to Moody Valley and this risks destroying the fragile road that already exists from the Beaver hangar on-

The works to Port Harriet to which his letter refers were properly authorised and have no effect whatsoever on any future works to the Murrell.

The other matter is the exchange of views caused by Mr Scott's letter about the airbridge. I have no intention of entering the "whingeing Pom" debate but I would like to clarify the third paragraph of Ben Claxton's letter where he says that, "...the RAF are just being helpful in carrying civilian passengers."

Civilian access to airbridge is guaranteed by a Joint Policy Statement issued by the MOD and the FCO covering military Tristar operations to the Falkland Islands and the carriage of fare paying passengers and freight. This was first negotiated when the Tristar came into operation to the Falklands and has been updated periodically since. It sets out amongst other things how the service should operate, the guarantees of seat allocation to civilians, service schedules and fare levels.

The people of the Falklands have a right to use this service on the terms agreed; this is not some kind of favour granted by the RAF but a means of support and security to the Falkland Islands granted by the British Government. Falkland Islanders do not have to live in fear that if they complain it might be withdrawn. We and service personnel travelling to the Islands have a right to be treated with courtesy and respect even when the circumstances are beyond the control of those at the interface with the public. People should be kept informed of what is going on so that they can make the necessary arrange-

I cannot believe for one moment that the MOD or any of its senior staff would disagree that the service they provide is one that they are charged by the British Government with providing, and that all their passengers, whether soldiers, contractors, nursing mothers or pensioners should be treated as respected clients.

Questions for oral answer

Energy efficient

DETAILS of the energy efficient house built for FIDC were given by the Chief Executive Dr. Michael Blanch in response to a question from Councillor Cheek last week.

The councillor asked for, "The total cost, what innovative energy saving features are incorporated into the design and how and when the general public will be able to view these features and obtain advice on their

Dr. Blanch said, "The cost of building the energy efficient house of 8 Biggs Road is £88.365.

"The design follows the guidelines in the Department of the Environment Good Practice Guide number 14 and many energy saving features included already do feature in some modern houses.

"This building incorporates all current major energy saving features into one house.

The main difference in design is that the living rooms and the kitchen are upstairs with the bedrooms down

"In any building with a high degree of insulation, the upper rooms tend to get hotter than the down

"This design tries to take advantage of this to provide comfortable temperature levels at lower cost.

" A sunroom or conservatory has been added upstairs to the Northwest corner to maximise solar heating gains in the upper living accommodation.

"Insulated plasterboard has been used throughout and the floor and loft insulation specified exceeds the guide-

"All internal pipe work has been insulated and a Thermomax hot water system, driven by roof-mounted solar panels will be incorporated to offset heating costs.

"The heating system will have both thermostatic radiator valves and a central programmable thermostat.

"As far as possible, low energy electrical equipment will be used and the possibility of adding solar electricity would be considered next year. Everything within the house should be achievable without huge expense by someone building a new house for themselves and many features could also be applied to existing older properties.

"Once the house has been constructed, it will be used as private accommodation, but viewing of the features will be possible by arrangement with the occupants through the Energy Advisory Officer at FIDC."

No waiting time for appointments

Memorial Hospital were the subject of a question asked at Legislative Council last Friday

"Sixteen days out of 23, there were non-urgent appointments available on the day. The Medical Department views a waiting time of more than five working days as undesir-

"Waiting times for specialist clinics such as Well Woman, Acupuncture etc. will obviously be longer. Because of the rota it is inevitable that waiting times to see a specific doctor may well be two weeks or more.

"The changes put into place in early October have had a significant

WAITING times at the King Edward impact and waiting times are monitored on a daily basis now.

> Councillor Summer responded with two supplementary questions. He asked. "Can the Honourable Member please give me assurance that the improvements in waiting times are not due to the exaltations for patients not to go to the hospital and to indulge in self-diagnosis and self-treatment and that patients should be very aware that they are very welcome at the hospital at any time, if they have any doubt at all about their health?

"The second is that is the five days a guarantee in outpatients or is it a guideline?

Councillor Edwards said, "I cannot give him the assurances that he wants. I would hope that what he says is correct and I will certainly consult with the Medical Department to assure that that is so - that patients are welcomed, that they are made welcome

"Again the five working days, is in the view of the Medical Department, undesirable. Again I can 't give you a guarantee on that but I will seek these answers for you and I will in due course let you know

Bitumen shortage - Ross Road repair delay

THE anticipated impact on the Capital Works Programme of a reported shortage of bitumen was revealed at Legislative Council last week.

Responding to a question from Councillor Summers, Councillor Sharon Halford said, "... a number of projects (in the Capital Works Programme) have been rescheduled.

"One item will not now be completed this season and that is the section of Ross Road in front of the Town Hall

"This area, which was previously scheduled to be undertaken in late February/early March, was to be reviewed in any event, following a recent ground investigation.

"The Public Works Department has diverted human and plant resources to other work which will include footpath repairs, outstanding maintenance on surfaced roads and an improvement of a dangerous bend on the North Camp track at Teal In-

Councillor Summers then asked that his colleague inform the House ... what action is being taken to ensure that this shortage does not occur again? I think it is the view of all of my colleagues, that this is most regrettable and probably avoidable. "Can we be assured that it cannot

happen again?" Councillor Halford replied, "...we can never be assured that it cannot

happen again. We would hope that it would not happen again. "Bitumen requirements were es-

timated in July prior to the start of the construction season. The Department has completed more surfacing work than was programmed at

"Supplies of bitumen were scheduled to arrive in the Falklands week ending November 19. Unfortunately, the ship transporting the material from Santiago to Punta Arenas broke down and the shipment missed the sailing of the Tamar.

"That is why we are currently in the situation we are. However, bitumen has now been ordered and some is due to arrive, on shipment from

"It is currently scheduled to arrive December 26, and the outstanding lot is also due to arrive on the Tamar in January. Therefore, we have much more in stock now than we would previously have had and hopefully, we should not run out

Reports from the Motion for Adjournment

Cllr. Summers - "unreserved apology"

COUNCILLOR Mike Summers used his speech to the Motion for Adjournment on Friday to apologise "unreservedly" to the government and the people of the Falklands if the illegal fishing incident involving the vessel Mila had "caused embarrassment."

Councillor Summers is a Director of Prion Limited, owner of the vessel recently convicted of illegal fishing.

The councillor noted his relief that the judgement had so "explicitly stated" that there was no question in the light of his tested evidence of any personal responsibility of the Directors of Prion Ltd.

The incident, "...naturally caused me and my family a good deal of anxiety for a number of both public and private reasons," said Councillor Sum-

He added, "For myself not least of these reasons is that I do not condone illegal fishing by foreign vessels or our own. Illegal fishing threatens the very future of the industry on which the future of the economic stability of the Falklands is based by undermining conservation measures worked out in detail for very valid reasons."

He said that he had been mindful. from the time that it first became evident that the vessel Mila had been acting illegally, that in the interests in the integrity and of the authority of the Falkland Islands Government I might have to resign."

Councillor Summers said the findings of the court, "... were always going to be critical." to his final decision and went on to quote from the judgement which noted there was no question in the light of Mr Summers tested evidence of any personal responsibility of the Directors of Prion Ltd.

Summers, "to those members of the public to whom I have spoken on this subject who have advised me that following the outcome of the trial there has been no general

wish or expectation that I should

"And I am equally grateful to those of my colleagues and others in the public service who shared with me their views on what would have been the right thing to do for the good of the government of the Falkland Islands. They have each indicated that in their view I should continue.

Councillor Summers added, "I have not of course been able to take account of the views of the minority of my colleagues who have spoken freely to others about what I should do but have not spoken directly to me. But perhaps the less said about that the better.

He said "If I did resign now not only would it cause cost and disruption but it might indicate to some a suspicion of personal guilt where none exists. I have therefore decided that I will complete my term on the Legislative Council and help to complete those programmes we have set out to achieve.

"I fully accept my responsibilities in respect of the Mila incident and I apologise unreservedly to the government and the people of the Falklands if it has caused embarrassment.

"In business as in government we go in with our eyes wide open. We take the good with the bad and the rough with the smooth. If we sometimes feel badly done by, by those whom we have trusted then so be it. We live in hope that there might be calmer waters ahead.

Widespread Euro Force Criticism

PROMINENT personalities involved in the 1982 Falklands Conflict have condemned British participation in a 60,000-strong European Rapid Reaction Force to which Britain has pledged a significant part of its three services.

General Sir Peter de la Billiere, who was Director of the elite SAS forces in 1982, and later Commander of British Forces in the Falkland Islands, and of the British Gulf War Forces, has warned that Britain's "armed forces are already stretched to the limit and, faced with severe recruiting and retention problems, it is far from certain that we can maintain our current commitments without a substantial increase in military budgets"

Writing in two mass circulation daily newspapers, the Daily Mail and the Sun, General de La Billiere, calls the creation of the new European Union force "a decision driven by political objectives rather than by military imperatives". He expresses concern that it could endanger or weaken NATO and Britain's special relationship with the United States.

These are points also stressed by Baroness Thatcher in a devastating attack on the European Force, and also by Lord Carrington, a former Defence Secretary and also Foreign Secretary who resigned over the Argentine invasion, and by two other former Defence Secretaries, Malcolm Rifkind and Lord (Dennis) Healey. What they do not mention, in expressing concern about alienating Washington, is the vital aid provided by the United States in the Falklands Conflict in intelligence information and provision of updated weaponry, including Harrier side-winder missiles.

Strong UK Troop, Navy and Air Force Contingents

The British Defence Secretary, Geoff Hoon, announced a maximum UK contribution to the Euro Force of 12,500 soldiers, with combat support elements such as artillery, attack helicopters and logistics units, as many as 72 combat aircraft including Sea Harriers, and eighteen warships, including one aircraft carrier,

two nuclear-powered submarines, four destroyers or frigates, and an amphibious task group.

The newspapers carry maps showing Britain's existing commitment of forces in 14 different places around the world, including the Falkland Islands which is listed as having a garrison of 1,650.

Prime Minister Tony Blair rejected the criticism as "wild ... bordering on the absurd... a caricature beyond parody". It is suggested the force will be used for peace-keeping, peacemaking and humanitarian missions in regions stretching from the Balkans and Eastern Europe to the Middle East and Africa.

The French Defence Minister has even predicted that the European Union could develop global security responsibilities.

No one seems to have answered the question of how Britain, with this new commitment involving major navy and air force assets, would respond to another Falklands-type crisis, especially as the rapid reaction forces includes contingents from 14 nations, including France, Spain and Italy, which could not be relied upon to oppose countries such as Argentina.

Joining in the condemnation, Admiral Sir Sandy Woodward, Commander of the 1982 Falklands Task Force, declared: "When trouble starts you will not be asking a job lot of Europeans for help The UK should hang around with the biggest kid on the block and that is the USA".

Significantly, former Assistant United States Defence Secretary, Richard Perle, who is tipped to become one of George Bush's national security advisers if he wins the presidency, described the European force as a monument to France's "towering conceit" designed to "marginalise the Americans in Europe".

Lady Thatcher reserved her most scathing criticism for Tony Blair. The force, she said, "makes no military sense at all. ...It is a piece of monumental folly that puts our security at risk in order to satisfy political vanity".

MIKE MOORE IN MONTEVIDEO

MIKE MOORE. Director of the World Trade Organisation (WTO.) is in Montevideo, Uruguay for a two day conferenceon how to solve disputes in the framework of WTO and Mercosur.

The second session (the first took place last year in Buenos Aires) of the II Annual Conference on Solving Irade Disputes in WTO and Mercosur will be held in Montevideo's Chamber of Commerce and Services.

Mr. Moore will lecture on "The WTO, prospects and challenges" and will then participate in a discussion panel on "The new WTO round, what does it offer to Mercosur members?

The conference is also in preparation of the tenth anniversary of the signing by Brazil. Argentina. Uruguay and Paraguay of the Asuncion Treaty, considered the founding stone of Mercosur, to be celebrated next year.

New Zealander Mr. Moore is also schedule to hold a private meeting with Uruguayan president Dr. Jorge Batlle and the Ministers of Economy. Trade and Foreign Affairs of Mercosur member countries.

FLORIANOPOLISSUMMIT

OPEN markets and free trade, cars. Chile, sugar, bicycles and foot and mouth disease are the main points of the Uruguayan agenda for the coming Mercosursummit to be held in Florianopolis, southern Brazilon December 15 and 16.

Uruguayan president Jorge Batlle is expected to stress, as he did in the recent Iberoamerican Panama summit, the importance of open markets and free trade in the context of a global world, in an attempt to open a debate on Mercosur tariffs.

The long debated car industry complementation agreement, apparently in its final stages, as well as the end of local sugar subsidies, effective next December 31, and Argentine impediments to Uruguayan bicycleexports, are also of particular interest to Uruguay which has had difficulties in its sales to its greater trade partners.

Chile's full integration, (in suspense because of different tariff policies), as well as a co-ordinated sanitary preventive policy regarding foot and mouth disease

that has scourged all Mercosur members in recent months, are expected to absorb much of discussion time in the coming presidential summit.

On the "unofficial" political agenda, strong public support to the new democratic pos Fujimori process in Peru is expected as well as an expression of concern over the election results in the United States.

CAR INDUSTRY AGREEMENT

THE disputed Mercosur Automobile Policy. PAM. which will extend for the next five years will be formally signed by the blocks' full members during the coming presidential summit in southern Brazil.

After months of deliberations, frustrations and deadlock over "components" definition and content. Argentina and Brazil finally defined the terms of the complementation automobile industry that represents almost 25% of intra Mercosur trade and is scheduled to become an open market by January 2006.

PAM establishes that the extra zone content of vehicles manufactured in Mercosur is limited to 44%. Auto parts and assembly plants are allowed to calculate this figure on a component by component maximum of 30% for cars and 25% for other vehicles (trucks, vans, tractors, etc.); or on a 44% "in process basis" (global) for cars and 37% for the second category.

Uruguay particularly, with its three local assembly plants, has been promised a 70 million US dollar annual sales quota to the Brazilian market and is negotiating similar terms with Argentina.

"We're optimistic; discussions have been undertaken with a more flexible and comprehensive spirit," said Uruguayan Industry, Trade and Mining Minister, Sergio Abreu.

URUGUAYANBONDS IN CHILEAN PESOS

FOR the first time in history, a Latinamerican country has floated bonds in another regional country's currency. The event involves Uruguay and Chile, with Uruguayan six year government bonds in Chilean pesos equivalent to 142 million US dollars.

OBESE KEEP "MUNCHING ON"

OBESITY is advancing among Mercosur residents similarly to what has happened in the first world.

During the recent Panamerican Obesity Conference held in Punta del Este, Uruguay, which convened 680 doctors from all the world, it was revealed that overweightness affects 55% of Argentines. 47% of Brazilians and 36% of Uruguayans who also have 18% of the population considered obese.

And although statistics are hard to come by, these figures keep growing steadily according to experts.

"A billion people in the world suffer from being overweight, of which 250 million are defined as obese," indicated Dr. Philip James from the International Obesity Task Force, who added that, Southamerican diet is too high in fat and half the population virtually don't practice any sport."

Dr. James said that under these

conditions, starting at 20/25 years.

.. men and women begin putting on weight," while. "... the ideal is a daily hour's physical exercise and a diet low in saturated fats and sugar.

The American expert said that an ideal diet includes a lot of vegetables, 20% fatty products at the most, minimum refined sugar and just four grams of salt per day

Dr. James also demystified magic slimming pills: "Very few products in the market have any effect and if they do, they must be accompanied by a specific diet and much physical activity."

As far as related diseases, the Conference mentioned cardio vascular complications, hyper tension and diabetes. "Almost 90% of world diabetes cases were triggered by overweight."

Among the reasons for the

growing numbers of obese people. Dr. James mentioned sedentary life style and cheap and richer food. "For just a few cents in the US you can get a second (unnecessary) helping.

"DIALOGUE ROUND" WITH A NATIONAL PURPOSE

ARGENTINA'S main business organisation. Argentine Industrial Union, UIA, gave its full support to Labour's proposition for a national "dialogue round" to help draw up a social pact that will pull the country out of recession.

The national "dialogue round" was one of Labour's demands during the 36 hour long national strike that brought Argentina to a standstill last

We urgently need an alliance between national production (farmers and industry) labour and the political class to create a socialeconomic project with a national purpose," said Jose Igancio de Mendiguren, Chairman of UIA.

Businessmen workers politicians have a responsibility with government, to discuss and create growth conditions that will solve people's problems. Growth with unfed people and high unemployment does not make sense," indicated Mr. de Mengiduren

The UIA chairman underlined that Argentina can grow at 7% annually. Let but to insist with a balanced budget when unemployment is increasing and in the middle of recession, will not help growth."

Argentine officials recently agreed with an international credit institution "armour plated" financial rescue package, estimated to cost 15/ 17 billion US dollars, conditioned to changes in labour and social security legislation which is openly resisted by the unions and the ruling coalition junior partner

Argentine Economy Minister Jose Luis Machinea revealed this week that, "lower revenue and less economic activity" will push this year's budget deficit to 6.3 billion, a billion over the sum agreed with the International Monetary Fund.

Machinea also anticipated that the deficit in 2001 will reach 6.5 billion, well above the 4.8 billion estimated in the budget currently under discussion in Congress.

FREE OF FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE

THE European Union declared Uruguay free of foot and mouth disease and added that fresh beef exports to the continent can be resumed this week. The decision leaves out the province of Artigas where two months ago an outbreak of the disease, apparently originated in neighbouring Brazil, was reported.

The announcement, following several European sanitary inspection missions to the country, comes as a relief for Uruguay, since the continent, together with Nafta countries, Israel, Chile and Brazil is one of its outstanding beef markets.

This is an acknowledgement to the determination with which Uruguay reacted to the outbreak, said Raul Lago, Secretary of the Uruguayan presidency

Mr. Lago pointed out that Uruguay's concepts of "traceability." regionalisation and full information transparency helped to identify and contain the damage to a specific area.

Even before the official diagnosis confirmed the disease. Uruguayan authorities ordered the immediate blockade with the Army of the province of Artigas, the killing of 25,000 head of cattle, sheep and hogs in the area where the outbreak first appeared and requesting an international sanitary mission of experts to assess counter measures.

The European Union purchased 97 million US dollars of Uruguayan

OPEC STIFFENS POSITION

THIS is a crucial week for Argentina and its international financial support better known as the support better known as the "annoured plated" financial package, which includes a starting sum of 17 billion US dollars, almost equivalent to Argentina's credit needs for 2001.

Teressa Ter-Minassian, head of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) delegation will be looking into the current budget performance and wait for the promised outcome of the budget under consideration in Congress, which includes several additional chapters to its original version.

The additives were the result of lengthy discussions between the De la Rúa administration and the Peronist opposition in Congress, and Peronist governors, (who control the main Argentine provinces), which should help with the creation of a political scenario that pulls Argentina out of its two years recession

However, last week's effective general strike that forced the IMF to delay its arrival plus the fact that the three rival labour unions supported the stoppage, could represent another obstacle to the beleaguered president De la Rúa administration, particularly if this leads to a downgrade in the investment grade of Argentina's international standing.

The "armoured plated" financial package includes funds from the IMF. Interamerican Development Bank. Argentine banks and pension funds.

TOLEDO LEADS IN PERU

ALEJANDRO Toledo, leader of the opposition who accused former president Alberto Fujimori of electoral fraud leads the opinion polls for the coming Peruvian general

elections of April 8.

According to the pollster Datum, Mr. Toledo leads with 26%, followed closely (22%) by Mr Francisco Tudela former vice president who resigned from Fujimori's party and is running as an independent. A distant third with 9% is Congressman Fernando Olivera, who triggered the crisis that finished with the Fujimori administration by revealing a video where the controversial Mr. Vladimiro Montesinos, former intelligence chief, bribes an opposition Congressman

Another 20% answered they had

no opinion yet.
The poll was taken immediately after provisional president Valentin Paniagua took office naming former United Nations Secretary General as Prime Minister.

One of the first decisions of the new government was to demote the heads of the Armed Forces and replace them with officers who had been forced into retirement by the Fujimori regime because they were not considered loyal to disgraced chief spy Montesinos.

President Paniagua also promised an in depth investigation into the misgovernment, bribery corruption allegations surrounding the Fujimori-Montesinos ten year administration, including the worst human rights record in the South

American continent.

Mr. Fujimori is currently residing in Japan from where he sent his resignation letter, but Mr. Montesinos' whereabouts is unknown, however bank accounts under his name, and relatives, with tens of millions of dollars have been discovered in Switzerland and Panama.



Update your business writing skills

WITH the ever-increasing speed of technological change, we all need to keep up-to-date with new equipment and new computer programs.

As soon as a new version of a popular program becomes available, we must learn it. When some new technology new comes out, we have to have it.

In line with technological developments, the way business is conducted generally has changed immensely over the last couple of decades. Business is being conducted in a much more informal way - a natural, informal, more relaxed language is being used in meetings and conferences rather than stilted, formal language.

So why is it that so many people are still using an old-fashioned. long-winded style of language in written communications? Some of the language and expressions that I see being used today seem more suited to our great-great grandfathers rather than 21st century businessmen and women.

It seems we are now writing more than ever. Most managers are creating their own communications - letters, memos, faxes, reports, articles, marketing material, and especially e-mails. Especially in this global age, speed is often the key to successful negotiations, so writing effectively under these circumstances is often very demanding.

But when are people going to realise that business language has

changed? Expressionslike "Please be informed". "Kindly be advised", "I would like to bring to your attention" and "I am writing to advise you" should be relegated to the recycle bin. Instead of "I should be very grateful" we should simply say "Please". Short words like buy, try, start and end should be used instead of purchase, endeavour, commence and terminate. With commas the rule is now less rather than more. Use short words. simple expressions, short sentences and short paragraphs that are clear and concise, instead of long-winded old-fashioned jargon that is sure to confuse.

Are you still using standard boring cliches like "Please find enclosed". "Enclosedherewith please find our catalogue for your reference and perusal", "Below-mentioned please note", "With reference to your above-mentioned order", "Further to the telecon today between your goodself and the undersigned", "Should you require any further clarification please do not hesitate to contact me"? If so, perhaps it's time to take a good look at your business language and decide how you can bring it up-to-date and in line with the 21st century?

Effective communication gives a professional impression of you and of your organisation. Effective communication helps to get things done. Writing effectively is perhaps the most demanding work we do. Writing requires imagina-

tion, creativity, organisation, careful planning and many other skills if a message is to be effective and obtain results. In today's fast-paced businessworld, there should be no room for yesterday's old-fashioned, long-winded jargon.

Today's business language should be proactive, stimulating, interesting, and most of all it should reflect your own personality. Instead of using standard boring clichés that have been around for decades, the key is try to write in a natural style, as if you are having a conversation. So when you are composing any business document in future, ask yourself: "If I was speaking to the recipient, would I say this?" and remember: IF YOU WOULDN'T SAY IT, DON'T WRITE IT!

General Practice by Dr Barry Elsby

COPD (Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease)

COPD is a very common condition in the UK and the Falklands. It accounts for more time off work than any other illness. COPD is a general term which includes the conditions Chronie Bronchitis and Emphysema.

What do the medical words mean?

· Chronic means ongoing and persistent.

· Pulmonary means 'affecting the

• Bronchitis means inflammation of the airways of the lungs (the breathing tubes)

· Emphysema is damage to the smaller airways of the lungs

· Either chronic bronchitis or emphysema can cause an obstruction (narrowing) of the airways. In many people a degree of both chronic bronchitis and emphysema are present. This is why the general term COPD is used to describe airways that are narrowed due to chronic bronchitis, emphysema or a combination of them both

What causes COPD?

The lining of the airways becomes inflamed and damaged. Smoking causes this inflammation and damage in the vast majority of people with COPD. There is no doubt about this. About 3 in 20 people smoking one-pack-per-day and 1 in 4 two-pack-per-day smokers de-velop COPD if they continue smoking. Air pollution and polluted work conditions may play a part or make the disease worse. However, people who have never smoked rarely de-

velop COPD.
What are the symptoms of COPD?

· Cough - this is often the first symptom to develop. It is usually productive with phlegm (sputum). It tends to come and go at first and then gradually becomes more persistent (chronic). The cough is often thought of as a 'smokers cough' in the early stages of the disease. It is when the breathlessness begins that people often become concerned, but then damage has been done.

· Breathlessness and wheeze - these may only be noticed after exertion at first. As time goes by breathlessness may develop even when resting. The decline in the breathing can be very gradual over a number of years if smoking continues. Eventually it can become quite serious and distressing in some people.

 Sputum - the damaged airways produce a lot more mucus than normal which forms sputum. People with COPD often cough up a lot of sputum each day.

· Chest infections - people with COPD are prone to chest infections. Wheezing with cough and breathlessness may become worse than usual when chest infections occur. There is often an increased amount of spu-

tum (phlegm) which may turn yellow or green.

What is the progression and outlook of COPD?

The symptoms described above usually take years to progress. Symptoms usually begin in people aged over 40 who have smoked for 20 years or more. Typically, there is a

very gradual decline over several years from an irritating 'smokers cough' to increasing breathlessness. There may at first be the occasional chest infection. Chest infections may then become more frequent as time goes by. If smoking continues, COPD usually becomes worse over time. Some people eventually become breathless and wheezy all the time. In some people the narrowed airways and increased breathlessness reduce the amount of oxygen passed from the lungs into the bloodstream. This may affect the heart which needs a good oxygen supply and cause heart failure. About 25,000 people die each year in England and Wales from the end stages of COPD. For many of these people there are several years of ill health and poor quality of life before death.

How can the course of the COPD be altered?

Stop smoking - this cannot be stressed enough. Stopping smoking will not reverse any damage already done to the lungs but it will greatly help to stop the disease getting worse. If this is done early on in the disease it will make a huge difference. When the condition first develops and symptoms are mild, some people deceive themselves (and others) and say that they have just a 'smokers cough' If smoking is stopped at this stage it is unlikely that COPD will progress to a severe illness. However, it is never too late to stop at any stage of the disease. Even people with fairly advanced COPD will benefit and prevent further progression of the disease.

Some people do give up smoking for a while but find their cough becomes worse. This often happens as the lining of the airways come back to life'. Resist the temptation to restart smoking to ease the cough. Any increase in cough after stopping smoking usually settles in a few weeks.

What are the treatments for COPD?

· Inhalers that open the airways (bronchodilators) are often prescribed. These work by relaxing the muscles in the airways to try and open them up as wide as possible. These include inhalers such as salbutamol. Inhalers work well for some people with COPD. In other people they may not work so well because of the damaged and thickened airways. Some people with mild or intermittent symptoms may only need any inhaler 'as required' for when breathlessness or wheeze occur. Some people need to use inhalers regularly. The different types of inhalers work in different ways and a combination of two inhalers may be beneficial for some people

· Steroid inhalers are useful for some people in addition to bronchodilator inhalers. Steroid medication 'dampens down' inflammation. To see if a steroid inhaler will help, a short course of steroid tablets may be prescribed. An improvement in symptoms or in breathing tests after a course of steroid tablets shows that a steroid inhaler may help. It is people with COPD who have an asthma tendency' who benefit from steroid inhalers most.

· Bronchodilator tablets which contain similar medicines that are in inhalers are sometimes prescribed. Inhalers are usually better and they also cause less side effects. However, some people find inhalers difficult and tablets may be an alternative.

· Steroid tablets are sometimes prescribed for a short course when very wheezy and breathless (often during a chest infection). They help by damping down the extra inflam-mation in the airways caused by infections.

· Antibiotics - chest infections are more common in people with COPD. These may be treated with short courses of antibiotics.

· Oxygen - in people with severe symptoms, regular oxygen may help. Some end up being attached to oxyen cylinders 24 hours a day

What can I do to help?
•STOP SMOKING

· Get immunised - a yearly 'flu jab' each autumn protects against possible chest damage from influenza. Immunisation against pneumococcus (a germ that can cause serious chest infections) may also be advised. This is one injection and not needed yearly like the 'flu jab'

· Keep fit - people with COPD who exercise regularly tend to im-

prove their breathing.

• Lose weight - if overweight. Carrying extra weight can make breathlessness worse.

In summary For most people, COPD is caused by smoking. SO STOP SMOKING

Many people with mild COPD slowly become worse because they continue to smoke.

If smoking is stopped, the progression of COPD can be slowed drastically. A much better quality of life can be expected for the coming years than if smoking were to continue.

The earlier smoking stops, the better. However, it is never too late to stop to have a beneficial effect on the disease.

Treatments with inhalers may help with symptoms but no treatment can reverse the damage to the airways.

Flare-ups of symptoms and chest infections may be helped by short courses of steroids and/or antibiot-

Recipes for the Falklands



Carne Machada Talquina by Elizabeth Villalon

THIS is a Chilean version of Pot Roast. It is a very tasty meal with a minimum of ingredients to feed the maximum number of people. To translate the title:

Carne is meat

Mechada literally translated means 'clumps of hair.' The meat is cooked until it is so tender it can be eaten with a fork and teased out into the individual fibres, looking like hairs

Talquina is from the are of Talcna, in the VII region of Chile between Concepcion and Santiago. It is the only region that cooks this recipe with wine

Ingredients

11/2 - 2 kg roasting joint of beef 3 carrots 6 cloves garlic salt and pepper cooking oil 3 onions 1 litre cheap white wine 3 tsp cumin seeds 6 bay leaves I cup tomato paste or juice comflour to thicken sauce

Method Slice the garlic, onions and one carrot. Cut the other carrots into

chunks. Cut slits in the meat. Insert the sliced carrot and half the garlic. Season

the joint. Heat the oil. Fry the rest of the garlic and one onion. Sear the meat on all sides.

All the wine and enough water to cover.

Add the rest of the vegetables and ingredients, except for the comflour. Bring to the boil. Simmer for 3 hours.

When ready to serve, remove the slice. Thicken the sauce with comflour and use as gravy. Serve with mashed potatoes, pasta or rice.



Bradford' fury at wool marketing proposal

Holdsworth and Hall condemn RBA initiative

A PROPOSAL to market wool directly from the Falkland Islands has infuriated Bradford wool merchants.

William Holdsworth of D.B. Holdsworth Ltd. and Robert Hall of Falkland Wool Growers Ltd. (companies that have sold Falklands wool for many years) have both condemned the Falklands Rural Business Association (RBA) initiative.

Mr Hall says he has "serious concerns" about it, and Mr Holdsworth claims "...it is not in the interest of Falklands farmers."

Oddly enough John Milne of Holdsworths who is said to have originally supported the direct marketing initiative now states in a letter that he believes it to be, "...inherently dangerous..."

The RBA proposal was presented to Executive Council in a paper by the Chief Executive on November 23, and approved in principle.

ciple.
It principally proposes that under RBA control, wool be stored, sampled and tested on the Islands and marketed (by the farmer) competitively using the internet. It would

be transported via Uruguay

The paper says, "The advantage would be to give RBA and individual farmers a better control of selling in order to bid up the price. If wool can be directly sold without going through Bradford then there will be savings in transport costs."

Among other things the facility would need

 dedicated use of part of the FIPASS warehouse.

•lots of 20 tonnes minimum and at least 45% of the Falklands wool product; thus FLH would have to be part of the scheme,

around £95,000 worth of equipment,

•£20,000 for cash-flow by way of an FIDC loan.

Elsewhere in the paper it is noted, "The current dominance by Bradford is unsatisfactory, particularly given the high costs of transport within the UK... and there are question marks over Bradford's continued place in the world wool mar-

Yesterday wool seller William

Holdsworth speaking to *Penguin News* from Bradford said. "...assuming coring can be undertaken accurately from an administrative

point of view, are the facilities in the Islands first class and, or, satis-

factory for the job?

"There is a danger of wools of differing qualities or microns being put together which would lead to a lesser return for the Falklands farmer... There could be quality problems... and a loss of contidence in Falklands wool."

Misunderstanding

Of selling directly from the Falklands he commented. "This sounds attractive to people there - like offering it on the internet to a world wide market, but that is a misunderstanding of the way that wool is sold. Wool is sold by our company and other companies throughout the world on a face to face basis with end users."

He explained that their marketing structure allows them to persuade buyers to purchase poorer fleece wool along with superior wool during difficult times for farmers. He believes this could not be done under the planned scheme and the inferior wool would be, "...left on the shelf."

Wholly inaccurate

Mr Holdsworth refuted the claim that new policies would reduce transportation costs saying, "...this is wholly inaccurate." He commented that freight rates to South America are high and there the wool would be blended with inferior South American wool before being transported in scoured or top form to Europe or the far east, "...so there are still transport costs."

He said, "Falkland Island Wool Marketing provides a virtual guarantee to our clients, not only that their wool will be sold, but also that it will be sold at the best available market price."

Merchants would lose out

The marketing of Falklands wool makes up approximately 15% of the company's turnover and he

admitted it would be. "...a serious blow," to lose it via a change of marketing policy by Falklands farmers. However he commented that common sense should tell FIG and others that "... both myself and Peter Marriot have demonstrated by our actions that we have acted in the best interest of the Falklands farmers."

Mr Robert Hall of Falklands Wool Growers was unhappy that wool merchants had not so far been asked to comment on the injigative.

He anticipated many problems with lotting and was concerned about speciality customers who did not buy wool in 20 tonne lots. He also believed this way of selling was not consistent with the idea of Falklands branding.

He noted that the initiative was being, "...put out in the RBAs name but most farmers don't even know about it.

"It appears to be a rehash of something initiated about two and a half years ago which farmers did not like."

RBA view

Mr Ron Binnie of the Rural Business Association commented that the wool sellers had made some reasonable points but, "..we wouldn't expect wool merchants to be supportive of the initiative." He said "We are just trying to

He said "We are just trying to cut costs and still have the opportunity to sell to either company.

"Currently farmers don't have any choice but to sell to those two companies. Our initiative means the wool could be core tested in the Falklands and then offered to either of those companies and they can say yes or no or we can accept a higher bid."

He added however, that the RBA needed to, "...slow down with the proposals," because many members were still uncertain about the initiative, "We are going to put it to our members again."

Mr Binnie believes that within five years the majority of wool selling will be undertaken via the internet. He said, "We have to keep up with the times."

The RBA met with the Development Corporation yesterday afternoon to discuss the proposals further.

Mr Binnie commented that the RBA will now inform their members, "...how far we have gone and then allow them to make up their own minds."

One constituency could work says Donahoe

SECRETARY General of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) Arthur Donahoe QC has suggested to councillors that should the Falklands government adopt a 'single constituency' then it should change its voting system.

Mr Donahoe was invited to the Islands to give councillors the benefit of his experience of constitutional change.

He was adamant that, "I don't think it is right that you should have a single constituency and then elect members on a first past the post basis.

"If there is to be a single constituency then the election process should be by some form of a proportional representation or preferential vote.

He feels if this was done correctly, "...it would be possible to put in place a voting system that while it wouldn't give an absolute guarantee it would virtually ensure that there would be representation



on the council from camp."

Mr Donahoe added however that rather than a single constituency he might propose a number of alternatives

Currently the Falklands is divided into two constituencies; Camp and Stanley.

SOMETHING that has struck me in my time here in the Falklands is how quick the community is to criticise the Royal Falkland Islands Police Force (RFIP.)

If it's not disparagement of the vast amount of funds they're spending on 'unnecessary' vehicles (complete with bullet-proof glass and concealed jet engines as an aerodynamic extra, if rumour is to be believed) then it is disapproval of the quantity of police personnel.

Isn't it odd that there is this atmosphere when you consider that everyone in the police force is someone's brother, sister, cousin or friend? Shouldn't this be an advantage when it comes to community policing?

When a friend of mine announced intentions to join the RFIP the reactions of those around her were shocking. Some threatened not to speak to her and treated her as a turn coat. How can this be? Surely by joining the police she is making her small contribution to society.

A barrier seems to exist between our police force and the community as

a whole, a barrier of intimidation and resentment.

Why does such a high proportion of the community feel so intimidated? Do we have too many police officers? In the UK, many villages the size of Stanley are allocated just one bobby and some feel we should follow this example. However, looking at the bigger picture, in actual fact we only have around twenty full time police staff expected to monitor a country roughly the size of Wales.

A perception of harassment also seems to exist. In most other communities, being caught short in public would probably result in a wee (no punintended) telling off by your local PC and a request to move on but in the Falklands you stand a good chance of appearing before the magistrate for a

quick bout of public humiliation.

This is confusing. It's not as though everyone in the police force is an egomaniac intent on putting as many of the community behind bars as possible. In fact, most of them are pretty dam decent people.

So why the nit-picking?

Because, on the whole, our police officers are probably a bit bored. They have been so efficient in maintaining a crime free society, they've practically done themselves out of a job.

With that in mind. RFIP. instead of focusing on the number of arrests achievable in a month, how about focusing on community policing? It's not often you see one of the boys (or girls) in blue standing outside the West Store chatting to passers-by.

How about leaving the nice new police vehicles parked at the station for an hour a day and making the effort to meet those you are serving and pro-

tecting?

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
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Leisure Centre best value?



PRIVATISING Stanley Leisure Centre (above) is just one of the possibilities being examined in a review of that department.

The group reviewing the Leisure Centre is one of a number of 'best value' groups formed to look at various government departments to see if the services they offer to the public can be improved.

The Leisure Centre 'best value' group say they have already had a number of meetings, "...and it became apparent from the outset that this is a seriously under-resourced area.

"It will need a far higher financial commitment if it is to develop into an effective provider of leisure activities to all in the community and thus help improve people's health." said a spokesman for the group.

Questions being asked by the group are:- Should the centre remain part of the Education Department, be run as a separate department, be privatised or run as a trust?

There also exists the possibility that the centre become a joint public/private organisation with local private sector finance being sought to build extensions for fitness suites and suchlike.

According to the committee the staff of the centre are well qualified as lifeguards but have had no training at all in other sports, use

of exercise machines or developing fitness programmes for people However, they say it is clear that staff are eager to receive training.

It has been suggested that a link might be set up between a leisure centre in England or New Zealand and staff exchanges be implemented.

Other questions raised include:

•How should we charge for the use of the facilities?

•Why is it that the large majority of the people using the centre are expatriates as opposed to Islanders?

Flow do we encourage usage? (Are our facilities attractive to chil-

dren and teenagers?)

•Should the centre be opened later in the evening and earlier in the morning? (Because a large percentage of the population work there are many hours during the day when the centre is virtually empty and others when it is overcrowded).

 Would a creche encourage non working parents in during the

day?

The Leisure Centre best value group comprises Barry Elsby. Frank Jackson. Ros Cheek. Shona Strange, St John Payne. Steve Dent and Anton Livermore.

They hope to hear views on issues such as these both from people who use the centre and those who do not.

Fishing company prosecuted for oil spillage

A SPILLAGE of around twenty litres of marine gas oil into Stanley Harbour led to the prosecution of a Chilean fishing company in court on December 4.

Pesca Chile SAA faced two charges; the first relating to a quantity of oil being allowed to escape or being discharged from the vessel MFV Betanzos. The second charge related to the failure of the master to report the incident immediately. The company pleaded guilty to both charges, which occurred on December 1.

In her summary Ros Cheek for the Crown Prosecution told the court that on the morning of the day in question fisheries officers arrived at FIPASS at around 8am where they observed a strong smell of diesel in the air and noticed an oily substance on the water. Samples were taken and were discovered to contain a mixture of oil and raw sewage.

She said there appeared to be no explanation as to how the contamination was discharged adding, "...it appears to have dispersed very quickly." Kevin Kilmartin representing the defendantsaid in mitigation that the spillage had happened overnight and the captain was in the process of investigating the cause the next morning when the FIG Marine Officer arrived to conduct his own enquiries.

He said that an oversight caused the automatic septic tank to discharge into the harbour and the captain believed the diesel had leaked into the septic tank from another tank.

In his summing up Senior Magistrate Keith Watson told the court that from the evidence submitted the discharge appeared to be of a minor nature.

For the charge relating to the discharge of the oil the company was fined £1,500 and for the non-immediate reporting of the incident there was no separate penalty. The maximum penalty for the discharge of such a substance is £100,000.

The company was also ordered to pay £382.50 prosecution costs. The *Betanzos* sailed from Stanley on Monday afternoon. (Info FIBS).

Man seriously hurt in RTA Wedding guests with a difference

A SERIOUS road traffic accident occurred last weekend.

At approximately 2200 hours Stanley police received a report from KEMH that a single vehicle accident had occurred on the road to Mt Kent, approximately four miles from the turn-off from the MPA Road. Police, fire and ambulance services all attended

According to Inspector Len McGill of the Royal Falkland Islands Police (RFIP.) "Three persons were in the vehicle at the time of the accident. Two had been uplifted by a passing vehicle and conveyed to Mt Kent. A third person was trapped in the vehicle and had to be cut free by the Fire and Rescue Service

All three were then conveyed

to KEMH: two were admitted, one with serious injuries. A hospital spokesman yesterday toldPenguin News that the individual with serious injuries. "... is to be medivaced to the UK as soon as the RAF can organise an appropriate team. hopefully in the next week

The driver of the vehicle was arrested and, according to Inspector McGill, is assisting police with their inquiries.

Medical Dept: suspension is routine

THE Medical Department has responded to an article in last week's Penguin News which stated Dr. Paul Vinall has been suspended by the General Medical Council for a period of eighteen months following accusations of sexual assault on female patients.

In a letter to Penguin News this week, the Medical Department

I READ with interest the letter by Mr Brian Summers of Cable and Wireless in your newspaper dated November 1, 2000. It concerned fibre optic cables and I wonder whether I could offer my comments

C&W loyal only to

shareholders

in reply

Cable and Wireless is a plc and as such has a lovalty only to its shareholders. The company's aim is to maximise wealth and earnings for shareholders. If members of the public wish to participate in this they can by simply purchasing shares. This is the way of the world and, I feel, totally right and proper. However, it also means that statements made by Cable and Wireless are not necessarily impartial and not necessarily in the best interests of the customer.

Mr Summers says that a fibre optic submarine cable would not be suitable for the Falkland Islands. He states that the nearest point for connection would be Buenos Aires an emotive place, but does not comment on where the next nearest is. Montevideo is only 28 miles away by submarine telephone cable. He estimates the cost of £60-70 million. Surely for a long term communication system we should consider whole of life costs and not just initial capital outlay. Only then can the costs of various systems be considered. I would be interested to know how much a cable costs in comparison to the current communications system. Sixty million pounds is a lot of money but geostationary satellites in high earth orbit are also extremely expensive

Mr Summers states quite correctly that submarine cables are

vulnerable. Yet the very name of his company involves images of submarine cables. If these cables are so vulnerable why has his company laid and used them for so long? (The first cable was laid by a predecessor of Cable and Wireless in 1851.) To show vulnerability he quotes the 1915 Montevideo cable. He does not say why it broke and how long it was out of action. He could quote other cables that have lasted only a few weeks. Equally he could quote most of the cables laid which have given reliable service for many years.

The Australian fibre optic cable is also mentioned. If they really are so unreliable why are countries still laying them? (Buenos Aires intends to join this "users of unsound technology club in 2003.)

Finally Mr Summers makes no mention of the advantages of fibre optics. One cable can provide huge numbers of voice and data channels as well as television, the internet and even telemedicine which is of immense value in remote communities. Orkney is currently trialling this. More importantly it can be done very cheaply for the subscriber. I can phone Stanley from the UK for 25% of the cost of phoning the other way.

I commend Mr Summers for his defence of his employer but he is not the person to make such decisions as his lovalties lie other than with the Falkland Islands. Perhaps an open debate in the Penguin News and even a well researched, impartial article giving all the facts and costs would be of benefit.

Common link with Channel Islands

The following is a letter to Falkland Islanders from the Channel Islands Occupation society. The letter was delivered to His Excellencythe Governor by tourists from Guernsev and Jersev last month GREETINGS from one group of islands that was occupied by enemy forces to another group that was similarly occupied.

Although your occupation last only a few months compared to the occupation of the Channel Islands by the Germans which lasted for five years, we can appreciate the tension and distress that such an occupation must have caused and the joy that liberation can bring. As we were able to rely upon Mr Winston Churchill from 1940 to 1945, so you could count on Mrs Thatcher in 1982. Both were determined leaders who would not stand by and see British territory invaded by an enemy power.

The CI Occupation Society was formed in 1971 not only to preserve and record all aspects of the

German occupation of the Channel Islands, but to promote friendship and reconciliation between former enemies. This is perhaps easy to say after an interval of 55 years when the Second World War ended, whereas your occupation ended only 18 years ago. Nonetheless it is important to now look forwards and to rebuilding links with old adversaries

Also, do not discard any artifacts of the period, which should be preserved for posterity and to remind future generations of what happened to your islands in 1982. Although relics of the Argentinian Army may still seem distasteful now, one day they will be seen as valuable historical relics.

MPA crosswind problems not unique

I RECENTLY returned from Marrakesh 24 hours late because our aeroplane had been unable to leave Madeira - the airport there had been closed for two days due to strong crosswinds.

It was ironic, therefore, on return to find PN (Nov 17) with your report of an MPA crosswind study project. MPA is not unique in having an occasional crosswind problem; many airfields throughout the world have similar difficulties, which in some cases are more persistent and more dangerous than

Moreover your report did not include details of the project - which agency had initiated the study, whether the Met Office at MPA or FIGAS were involved, and who will be paying the substantial bill. A study of the airflow in the Wickham Range/MPA area will be of interest, to add to the large body of local knowledge which already exists but I am unable to grasp the proposition that forecasts could be improved, being dependent on larger scale (synoptic) changes.

The choice of Mount Pleasant for the site of the Falklands' airport was doubtless the result of a number of overwhelming considerations with wind conditions being very low on the list. FIGAS has had some of the most experienced crosswind pilots in the world, who when flying parallel to the Wickham Range, had experienced for years the turbulence and rotor streaming in northerly winds. But were they ever consulted? Indeed, has there ever been a study of diversion from MPA?

At a time when there were three Tristar flights, with an additional two Hercules 'airbridge' flights per week, diversions due to crosswinds were quite rare. When Britannia Airways had the contract during the Gulf war, there were no diversions, nor did British Airways or Virgin when they had the contract. So what has changed?

ANTARCTIC"TEACHERS"

AN Argentine couple, both teachers, and their two children aged 13 and 12 will spend a year in the Argentine Antarctic base of Esperanza, where they will have the responsibility of running a school with twelve pupils.

Alejandra and Alfredo de Paz, who have been living in Ushuaia since 1992, were selected after living for a couple of weeks under similar Antaretic conditions in a pilot station in Tierra del Fuego, and successfully passing psychiatric tests.

Mrs De Paz. 37, is an elementary school teacher and her husband Alfredo, 43, teaches maths and physics.

They will be working at the four year old Provincial School No 38 "Julio Argentino Roca" where all the twelve pupils including their two, Gregorio and Victoria, are children of the staff at the base.

"It's family dream come true," said Alejandra, adding that, "...we are looking forward to the challenge that is both pedagogics and personal."

According to the Argentine press the de Paz family will be leaving for Esperanza in mid January in the Almirante Irizar.

"We all got hyped with the idea when I invited the father of one of my school childrento give the class a lecture on his personal experience in the Antarctic: since then it became a kind of fixed idea for all of us," confessed Mrs De Paz.

The school is financed by the Argentine Army, the Tierra del Fuego government and the Antarctic National Department.

ARGENTINE BEEF PROMOTION

TAKING advantage of the recurrent mad cow scare in the European Union Argentina has begun an aggressive campaign to promote organic and grass fed beef mainly in Germany and Spain.

According to the Buenos Aires press. Argentina is promoting beef in food exhibitions and some of the giant stores hoping to fill the vacuum left by the collapse of the European beef industry and consumers fear of catching mad cow disease, after new cases were reported in France and Germany.

Apparently in Spain beef production has dropped almost 70%. and consumer sales between 22 and 25%.

However Argentine diplomats point out that Argentine beef is expensive for the European consumer: the so called Hilton quota, limited to 28,000 tonnes per annum is taxed with a 20% tariff, and any volume in excess pays an additional 13% tariff plus 339 Euros for every one hundred kilos of beef.

"This makes it 50% dearer than the local production, which is terribly unfair. Argentine beef is far superior to the European production, even without the mad cow scare," said Eduardo Villalba from the Trade Department of the Argentine Embassy in Madrid.

"NO SURPRISE"

ARGENTINA and Brazil said that news about a possible bilateral free trade agreement between the United States and Chile announced by Chilean President Raúl Lagos during a visit to California, was no surprise.

During a routine meeting of Mercosurofficials in Buenos Aires. Argentine Deputy Foreign Minister Horacio Chighizola said that. "We perceived for some time, clear signals that Chile was heading in that direction."

Chile is an associate member of Mercosur and has repeatedly declared a convergence of political interests with the South American trade block, but since its tariff policy is far more open and liberal, Chile has been reluctant in becoming a full member.

In spite of the potential impact of Chile joining the NAFTA, Argentina and Brazil played down the news and said that it was, "too soon to jump to conclusions. President Lagos only announced the beginning of the talks."

However Brazilians were more direct. "This is a change of policy." indicated Luiz Felipe de Seixas Correa, Brazilian Deputy Foreign Minister.

Chile already has bilateral trade agreements with Canada and Mexico, that together with the US conform the North American Free Trade Agreement.

WORLD ECONOMY SLOWING DOWN

THE industrial activity on both sides of the Atlantic is slowing down meaning that the fast growth cycle might be coming to an end.

According to reports from the US Commerce Department, industrial goods demand has been dropping for the last four months and has reached its lowest index in two years, that is 47.7 last November. When the index is below the 50 benchmark, the industrial sector is considered in contraction. Twelve months ago the peak was 53.1.

In Europea similar index shows the same decreasing tendency reaching 54.6 last October, its lowest since August 1999.

Although the index in Europe is still above 50, what concerns is the speed of the decrease- last April it reached 60.7, the highest in the last three years.

But in spite of the adverse news

for industry, in the money markets the Euro recovery vis a vis the dollar is considered a direct consequence of the new growth scenario between the two giants.

"DEATH CARAVAN"

IT IS estimated that 77 leftists and union leaders were killed or remain disappearedas a result of the "death caravan." an executing rampage by the Chilean military immediately after the September 1973 coup that took General Pinochet to power and for which a Chilean Judge now, 27 years later. has placed him under house arrest.

Judge Juan Guzmán ordered the arrest of Pinochet for allegedly masterminding the planning and organising of the "death caravan."

The decision that was hailed by human rights groups in Chile and Europe, however opens a big question as to how the Chilean military might react.

The "death caravan" was headed by General Sergio Arellano Stark currently under arrest with other officers involved in the killings, and took place mainly in the north of the country.

General Arellano Stark and his "death squad" travelled in a Puma helicopter visiting detentioncentres and after summary war councils and fierce interrogations, shot and buried the hooded and handcuffed prisoners in distant places like abandoned mines.

The official report at the time was that "they had been shot while trying to escape." However in a rare admittance of events, some time later then dictator Pinochet declared that the prisoners, "had not been shot, they had been sentenced and executed."

Besides, documents from the time indicate that the General responsible for the area where the killing occurred wrote to Government House in Santiago reporting the activities of the General Arellano Stark and his flying Puma "death squad."

Judge Juan Guzman began his inquiry into the "death caravan" activities after a book published by investigative reporter Patricia Verdugo, and titled The claws of the Puma.

In Santiago a government spokesman said that, "...the most important thing is that Chileans are equal under the law. We must let the Courts do their job." Pinochet could still escape trial if medical tests ordered a month ago find that he is insane or suffering from dementia.

BRIGHT FUTURE

THE Regional Citigroup CEO Carlos Fedrigotti anticipated Argentina will overcome the current adverse situation and will end the year with a clear scenario for the future.

"We have a positive forecast for Argentina, they are doing the right things in the right direction, and will be able to recover the current lack of confidence," said Mr. Fedrigotti who added that the agreement with the International Monetary Fund "will be signed and in effect before the end of December".

Mr. Fedrigotti was in Montevideo last week for the celebration of the 85th anniversary of the American City Bank in Uruguay.

The Citygroup CEO said that once an agreement with the IMF is reached Argentina will have access to the several billion US dollars "armoured plated" credit that "will help lower the country risk and interest rates, following which the Argentine economy will begin to grow".

Mr. Fedrigotti said that Citygroup is planning to grow both in Argentina and Uruguay. "We don't have an

"We don't have an opportunistic approach, we have a medium and long term policy, and if our clients expand, we expand with them."

BRAZILIAN INFLATION

THE Economic Policy Committee of the Brazilian Central Bank confirmed last week that Brazilian inflation continues to slow and will reach the 6% target for the year 2000 agreed with the International Monetary Fund.

In spite of oil prices, inflation last October was below target, and keeping interest rates at a basic 16.5% ensures that the, "financial targets will be complied with."

However some economists believe there could be surprises during the coming financial year because the monthly national minimum salary starting April 2001, was fixed at the equivalent of 90 (ninety) US dollars.

In related news the government National Economic and Social

Development bank indicated that Brazil collected 100 billion US dollars between 1991 and 2000 from the sale of government companies at federal and state level. Federal privatisation summed 54 billion US dollars (27 billion in telecommunications); 27.7 billion from the selling of state run companies and another 18 billion from privatised companies standing debts.

PERONISTS PROMISE SUPPORT

THE opposition Peronist party promised full support to the Argentine budget passed in the House of Representatives and forecasted that the upper chamber debate should be over by mid December.

Senator José Luis Gioja, president of the Budget Committee said that some of the modifications introduced by Deputies were "very good" adding that "we managed 90/95% of our demands and there are only some slight differences regarding the financing of provincial debts."

However the De la Rua administration was not so enthusiastic since a "modernisation article" that would give the government a free hand to leave civil servants redundant was not included.

"We basically agree with what was passed but it's unfortunatethat article 58 was erased", said Economy Minister Jose Luis Machinea.

Dissident Deputies from the ruling coalition and the opposition voted down Article 58.

The budget contemplates a 7 billion US dollars deficit with a 3% economic growth and deep reforms to the social security system and deregulation of labour unions health and recreational funds.

Meantime in Mexico City where President De la Rúa was present for the taking office of Vicente Fox. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright reiterated Washington's full support to the "Argentine government and its current economic course".

RECESSION AND UNEMPLOYMENT

URUGUAY'S two year long recession will continue well into 2001 and 600.000 Uruguayans have employment problems, according to a paper from the Cuesta Duarte Foundation funded by labour unions.

The 600.000 is split among 190.000 unemployed, (100.000 in Montevideo and 90.000 in the rest of the country): 381,000 with part time or precarious jobs and 40.000 who simply have given up looking for employment.

Cuesta Duarte foundation points out that the original numbers to elaborate on these conclusions were taken from the official National Statistics Institute, and adds that the budget deficit contrary to the government estimate of 2.8% of GDP, will be closer to 3.5% of GDP.

"Recession will extend well into

next year, mainly because the government opted for a fiscal approach instead of an anti cyclical budget to help home demand recover," reads the paper...

Government argues that by keeping a tight budget, inflation down and a more realistic exchange rate (faster than inflation), an export oriented recovery can be achieved.

Uruguay's total population is 3.3 million.

ARCTICSUNRISE IN BUENOS AIRES

THE Arctic Sunrise belonging to the environmentalist group Greenpeace is in Buenos Aires to begin another campaign against toxic waste in rivers and seas.

Under English Captain Peter Bouquet the 50 metre long Arctic Sunrise visits Argentina for the second time.

"This is part of the world campaign for clean industry and against toxic and contaminating waste," said Emiliano Ezcurra. Argentine spokesperson for the group.

In 1998 the Arctic Sunrise with its militant ecologists sailed up the Parana. exposing some of Argentina's main chemical companies and petrochemical plants as environment polluters, and in a second leg of the campaign the group did something similar in the Buenos Aires area and in Bahia Blanca.

"We pressed criminal charges under Argentine law against all those companies," said Mr. Ezcurra, adding that, "We chose the main companies so they couldn't argue they didn't have money."

The Arctic Sunrise is quite famous: it has visited Antarctic stations, chased Japanese whalers close to Tasmania, reported on oil rigs in the North Sea, checked climatic changes in the North Pole and was recently in California to protest the launching of the US anti-missile shield.

NEW WTO ROUND

IN a quick visit to Argentina and Uruguay Mike Moore, chairman of the World Trade Organisation, urged a new trade round for the coming year and anticipated that agriculture will be in the negotiation table.

"In the capitals of the powerful countries everybody knows that no new trade round will begin, and none will end, until agriculture is considered as Uruguay and other countries are demanding, "said Mr. Moore during a conference in Montevideo.

However the WTO chairman pointed out that agriculture was not the only priority: "We have the needs of the food importing countries and of those who export, and it's not always easy to implement complex issues rapidly."

Mr. Moore also indicated that the WTO works on consensus and warned that the longer the delay, "...greater the risks for the

multilateral system. But this depends on world leaders and governments, so trade is in the hand of governments and the WTO does not infringe in countries sovereignties.

Present at the conference was acting Uruguayan president Luis Hierro who in a brief introduction asked WTO to promote a more "fair" and less "arbitrary" world trade, with better opportunities for agricultural countries such as the Caims Group.

Acting President Hierro revealed that during 1999, rich countries supported farming with 360 billion US dollars, "...and we all know that behind a subsidy lies an inefficiency; so we demand from the rich countries the same efficiency criteria in farming as they pretend to impose in the rest of the world for all kinds of production."

Finally Mr. Hierro said that the solution of trade disputes is nowadays the essence of the life of nations.

The WTO chairman admitted that in the short term some people suffer from globalisation and the opening of economies but in the "...long term everybody benefits".

US VISA WAIVER FOR ARGENTINA

CITIZENS from Argentina and 28 other countries considered of "low risk" are now entitled to enter the United States without a visa on a permanent basis.

The visa waiver project that was started in 1996 means that Argentines can travel without restrictions to the US for tourism or business, and remain in the country for a maximum of 90 days.

Argentina apparently was considered because of the low rejection of visa applicants and the new laser reading passport that facilitates migration checking. The scheme also demands reciprocity for US citizens travelling to the visa waiver countries.

According to US Congressional records the visa waiver project not only saved money, labour and time, but helped increase tourism from those countries: in 1998-18 million visitors travelled to America.

Other countries benefited with the visa waiver project are Uruguay, United Kingdom, New Zealand, Italy, Ireland, Singapore, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Finland, Iceland, Slovenia.

FISH PLANT IN COMODORO

A NEW fish processing plant belonging to Spanish company Argenova was inaugurated this last week in Comodoro Rivadavia.

The two million US dollar plant will process, fraction and pack fish and crustaceans employing an estimated one hundred people according to company officials.

To stress the importance of the investment Mr. Mario Losada, provisional head of the Argentine Senate and acting Argentine president (Mr. De la Rúa was in Mexico) participated in the ceremony.

During the inauguration members of Congress also revealed that the current fuel subsidies that benefit Patagonia and which the government originally wanted to eliminate, will remain intact following a political agreement on

the budget.

AIR RATES INCREASE

CHILEAN airlines have increased their rates in coincidence with the high season, although some of the special promotions will still be available under certain conditions.

As of this month the 50,000 Chilean pesos promotional return ticket Santiago/Punta Arenas increases to 89,900 pesos plus 7,578 boarding tax for the three airlines flying to the extreme south of Chile: Aero Continente, Avant and Lan Chile-Ladeco.

However for those flying with Aero Continente, promotional tickets booked before November 25 will be valid until December 6.

In Avant promotional rates previously booked are valid until December 15, while Lan Chile-Ladeco special rates for students and pensioners will remain available until next March as long as they are booked before December 31.

In spite of the rate hikes Aero Continetal is considering a second daily schedule from Santiagoto Punta Arenas.

MAGALLANES "ORGANIC" BEEF

CATTLE ranchers in Magallanes together with local, regional and national authorities are considering a project to promote the region's beef following the successful experience of the Magallanes lamb, that has had an excellent response from the high bracket retail shops in Santiago.

"Strategies for developing the beef industry." is the name of the project which is being analysed by the Regional Agriculture Office with the help of the Chilean Institute of Agricultural Research.

"The idea is to have a 300/350 kilos heifer in nine months, with top quality organic beef," indicated Mr. Victor Vargas from the Agricultural Office in Punta Arenas.

Mr. Vargas said that in spite of the fact it will take time to advance the project. "...we're very optimistic, since we've tied together all the needed official support and farmers are very enthusiastic."

REGIONAL PROMOTION

THE Promotion Corporation for Magallanes received a 300,000 US dollars consulting grant to promote, attract and facilitate investments in the southern Chilean Region.

The grant should help elaborate a development feasibility project with different initiatives that should help diversify the Magallanes economy and improve conditions for those areas that are successful.

Gonzalo Vera, head of the project said that the main immediate target will be to collect as much information as possible to create a data bank from which then plan possible alternatives.

"Promotion at national and foreign level is essential for whatever we decide," stressed Mr. Vera who explained that similar 18 months project are being considered in all of Chile's Regions with the exception of metropolitan Santiago.

"I believe that by next January we'll be able to invite consultants and begin the licensing process of

PENGUINS THREATENED

MEMBERS of the Otway Foundation who for the last ten years have been looking after the well being and conservation of the Otway rookery in the Punta Arenas area of influence, claim that local residents are disturbing and scaring the penguins particularly in nesting time

An estimated 10,000 Magellan penguins concentrate at Otway and apparently,"...unscrupulous persons who make a living collecting kelp are creating chaos among the colony," reported Luis Agurto. Manager of the Foundation to the Punta Arenas press.

"It's hard to make tourists understand that while we endeavour to protect and help the penguins some local residents are intent on disturbing the sea birds." said Mr. Agurto.

However Mr. Agurto pointed out that the Foundation is well aware that for many people collecting kelp is a seasonal job, but this, "...should not interfere with our conservationist efforts, and eventually tourism since the rookery is a well known international attraction.

UNITED KINGDOM CONDONES DEBT

THE United Kingdom announced it will condone the debt of yet another 21 countries among which several are from Latinamerica: Nicargua, Bolivia, Honduras and Guyana, plus other African nations.

The total number of countries benefited will now rise to 41, equivalent to 2.3 billion US dollars.

However the British government made it quiet clear that the authorised funds must be redirected to public health, education and to combat poverty

Fighting poverty must be parallel to wiping corruption in the benefited countries, "...and we will make sure those funds will help the poor, not the local bureaucracie.s" said Chancellor of the Exchequer Gordon Brown, adding that the, "...anti poverty funds will be managed by non government organisations

Mr. Brown made announcement in a public rally in London where he revealed that he had received 300,000 letters from "Jubilee 2000" petitioning the government to condone the world's poorest countries debts. Among those letters was one from Mr. Brown' mother, "Don't bother to reply, save the stamp and help the poor.

THE PAMPA UNDER WATER

ALMOST two million hectares, approximately 10% of the humid Pampa in Argentina is covered in water as a direct result of improper drainage causing losses to the tune of one billion US dollars.

The Pampa is one of the naturally richest farmlands in the world, and it will take years for the soil to recover its potential, and to rebuild the destroyed communications and storage infrastructure plus towns and private homes.

The area flooded covers prime parts of the provinces of Buenos

Aires, Córdoba, Santa Fé and La Pampa, and according to the Argentine press is equivalent to 100 times the area of Buenos Aires City, Argentina's capital where 4 million people live.

According to experts the situation is manageable, but unless the pluvial surplus is not properly channelled and drained the soil could begin an irreversible process.

Recently a British consulting company, Halcrow & Partners was contracted to assess a drainage plan for the Salado river basin in the province of Buenos Aires covering an area of 200,000 square kilometres. But the cost, 1.3 billion US dollars, was considered far away from any immediate decision

A "COMPATIBLE" DECISION

CHILE'S decision to begin talks with the United States to reach a bilateral free trade agreement is "compatible" with the current status of the associate Mercosur member. according to a release from the Brazilian Foreign Affairs Ministry.

Just two weeks from the Mercosur summit scheduled in Brazil that included Chile's full membership in the agenda, the Santiago government decision caused irritation among the customs union main partners, Brazil and Argentina, but Uruguay said that, Chile sinitiative could be beneficial if it helps to advance the US sponsored Free Trade Association of the Americas.

Trade talks between Chile and the United States don't represent an obstacle for Chile to retain its condition of associate member according to terms in the 1996 Complementation Economic Mercosur-Chile Agreement," reads the Brazilian official release

However the first reaction of the Brazilian delegation present in Mexico for Vicente Fox's taking office when the news broke out, was that, "...talks for the full incorporation of Chile to Mercosur are now suspended." are now suspended.

Argentine president Fernando De la Rua was also surprised by the Chilean-US announcement and said. We have a coherent policy and our way is different to that chosen by Chile."

Anyhow close sources to the Argentine delegation remarked, "We still have two weeks to cool down and think.

Brazilian president Fernando Cardoso admitted that the Chilean decision caused irritation. Brazil's policy, backed by the Argentine administration has been to strengthen Mercosur with the full incorporation of Chile, and then sit down to talk with Washington about the free trade association of the three Americas.

Uruguay on the other hand has experienced the full impact of the January '99 Brazilian currency devaluation and two years of Argentine recession and favours the quick beginning of a round of trade talks with United States and Nafta partners, Mexico and Canada.

Mercosur presidents present at the inauguration of Mexican President Fox were also disappointed because Mr. Fox did not once mention Mercosur in his taking office

International Forum on solving the incidental capture of seabirds in longline fisheries

A report by Grant Munro, General Manager of Consolidated Fisheries Ltd

AS part of Consolidated Fisheries on going efforts to reduce to a minimum any detrimental interaction with seabirds from its operations the General Manager, Grant Munro, recently represented the Falklands at a conference in New Zealand addressing the accidental capture of seabirds in longline fishering

The conference was an opportunity for fisherman and biologists to meet and discuss how seabird catches could be reduced on a global scale through governmental legislation, gear development and industry initiative. It showed the Falklands along with Australia, Alaska New Zealand, and the Antarctic Treaty areas to be at the forefront of efforts to reduce the level

of seabird captures.

In the Falklands the issue has been identified and quantified. The use of mitigation measures to reduce catches are obligatory and the industry works closely with the Fisheries Department to ensure that this issue does not develop into a problem in the Falklands. Unfortunately this is not the case in all countries where albatross forage. Southern seabirds such as albatross have extensive foraging ranges. It is important that all countries adopt the mitigation measures that have been shown to be effective. Unilateral action by the Falklands and some others will have limited effect if the seabirds are being caught in other areas of their range. For example it is estimated that there are approximately 2000 vessels longlining for Tuna globally. The majority of these operate on the high seas fisheries with limited control from their flag states. Given that these vessels use pelagic lines close to the surface the potential for interaction is high. There is also a large illegal and unregulated fishery for toothfish in the southern

It is the challenge of the indus-try to educate all fishermen to adopt mitigation measures. Most of the avoidance techniques are simple and cheap. Used individually they can reduce bird catch by 80 % and when used together they reduce the catch of seabirds to almost zero. To those fishermen and countries that are less concerned with the death of seabirds there is also an economic consideration. Depending on the fishing method used, up to 20 baits are taken by seabirds before one is accidentally caught, this results in un-baited hooks that will not catch fish.

A recent report from Falklands Conservation on the decrease in numbers of black browed albatross breeding on Beauchene Island has highlighted the potential for interaction between commercial fisheries and seabird populations, even if this interaction is occurring out with the Falklands Maritime Zone.

CFL has been aware of the potential interaction since it was formed in 1994 and over the last six years the company has striven to reduce accidental catches of seabirds to zero. The company has always been proactive and within the companies first years of operation visits by both Graham Robertson, of the Australian Antarctic Division, and Nigel Brothers, of the Tasmanian Parks and Wildlife Services, were funded by Consolidated Fisheries. These two people brought extensive knowledge of seabird interactions from other longline fisheries and were tasked with identifying measures that could be adopted by CFL's vessels to avoid similar problems in the Falklands. They spent time on both longline vessels, observing the fishing operations, and the measures they recommended were immediately adopted. In addition much of the knowledge that they gained was disseminated to other organisations and many of their ideas were incorporated by CCAMLR, the body responsible for fishing in the Antarctic regions, in their legislation for avoidance of seabird catches.

The reason for the interaction between seabirds and longline fisheries is that seabirds have learned to follow vessels and scavenge the offal and bycatch discharge. This behaviour results in their vulnerability to fishing techniques in which hooks and baits are near the surface for any length of time. Most birds get caught when baited hooks first enter the water and have not yet sunk to a depth at which they are no longer visible. Birds following the vessel in search of food seize any baits they can get. If the bait is swallowed or if the bird is foul hooked whilst attempting to retrieve a bait they can be caught and drowned as the line

Given that most birds locate their food by sight and that they do not generally dive to more than 10 meters most avoidance techniques rely upon protecting the baits until they are below the dive depth of birds. How this is done depends upon the fishing method used and the bird species that is at risk. For demersal longline vessels, such as operate around the Falklands, it is calculated that up to 20 hooks remain accessible for between 10 and 15 seconds. This represents a distance of approximately 50m behind the vessel in which

baits are still accessible to diving

In the demersal longline fishery the single most effective measure is the deployment of one or more bird scaring lines during setting. These are lines, 150m in length. towed from a high point on the vessel to which are attached streamers. These streamers move unpredictably in the wind and scare birds away from the 50m area in which baits are accessible. It has been shown that a well designed and correctly deployed bird line can reduce the likelihood of accidental seabird catch by 80%. Other measures of great significance are correct weighting of the line so that baits sink out of the danger area as quickly as possible and night setting so that the baits are not visible to the birds. There are many additional measures of lesser importance which when combined with the above 3 measures can reduce accidental catches of seabirds to almost zero.

Other methods, which are currently under development, were highlightedat the conferenceand if these methods prove to be effective Consolidated Fisheries would be keen to conduct further sea-trials

The Falkland Islands should be proud of the steps taken to ensure that all the fisheries are managed in a responsible, sustainable manner with minimal impact upon other interacting species. The challenge is now to persuade other nations and their fishermento act in a similar responsible manner.

Chilean govt seeks FI expertise

Report by Mike Bingham, Environmental Research Unit ONE of the earliest references to penguins comes from the Dutch explorer Oliven van Noort who recorded visiting Isla Magdalenaduring the sixteenth century to collect penguins and eggs for food.

Isla Magdalena now belongs to the Chilean government, who have designated it "Monumento Natural de los Pinguinos." LanChile passengersapproaching Punta Arenas will recognise the island by its

lighthouse.

It has long been known that Magdalena held one of Chile's largest penguin colonies, but the penguins had never been counted until last month when husband and wife team Mike and Elena Bingham conducted a census.

Mike has been studying penguin populations in Chile since 1996 and earlier this year the Chilean government asked if he could conduct a seabird census of Magdalena. Mike accepted the challenge, accompanied by his wife Elena, who was co-founder of the Environmental Research Unit.

The work began last month with a detailed survey of the island, recording the locations of all breeding birds, not just penguins. Over 94% of the island is covered by Magellanic penguin burrows but there were variations in nesting density which had to be carefully mapped. Nest densities were determined in each area by counting occupied burrows in 50m by 50m study plots and the resulting distribution was drawn up as a map.

The area of occupation was multiplied by the nesting density in each sector, to give a population total. An incredible 59,540 breeding pairs for an island of just 0.7sq km. That is equivalent to nearly half the entire Falkland population of Magellanic penguins, on an island the size of Cape Pembroke.

Every inch of suitable ground

is packed with occupied burrows. Very different from the Falkland Islandswhere less than 20% of burrows are occupied due to population decline. Falkland penguins suffered massive declines during the 1980s and early 1990s but Gentoo and Rockhopper penguins have made a small recovery since 1995. Unfortunately Magellanic penguins are still declining.

Study plots around the Falkland show that Magellanic penguins have declined by 70% over the last 10 years, but these declines have not occurred 300 miles away in Chile. The difference seems to be linked to food abundance, with Magellanic penguins in the Falklands taking nearly twice as long to find food for chicks. More food should mean better chick survival and chicks on Magdalenado indeed have a 50% greater survival rate than in the Falklands.

Mike and Elena return to Island Magdalena in early December to census gulls and cormorants and to measure breeding success during incubation. The Chilean government have also asked the Environmental Research Unit to train their part wardens so that they can ensure the long-term future of a seabird monitoring programme in Chile. It is hoped that this training programme will commence in 2001 if funding can be found.

General Practice by Dr Barry Elsby

ACNE is very common. Most people with acne are aged between twelve and 25 but some older and younger people can be affected. About 9 in 10 teenagers will develop some degree of acne. Untreated acne usually lasts about four to five years before settling. However, it can last for over ten years in some people. Acne ranges from mild to severe but in most people it can be treated.

What causes acne?

Small glands (sebaceous glands) lie just under the skin surface. These glands make the oil (sebum) that keeps the skin supple and smooth. Tiny pores (holes) on the skin normally allow the sebum to come onto the skin surface. The cause of acne is thought to be as

• The amount of sebum is increased in the teenage years. This is due to the hormone changes of puberty that stimulate the skin glands. As a rule, the more sebum that is made, the ore greasy the skin feels and the worse acne is likely to be. Some people make more sebum than others

 Some pores become blacked. This is due to the top layer of skin in the pores becoming thicker combined with dead skin cells that are

shed into the pores.

 Sebum collects under blocked. pores which swell to cause blackheads and whiteheads. These are small spots on the skin. The spots enlarge into pimples (papules). Things may not progress beyond this stage. This is called mild noninflammatory acne. (The black of the blackheads is due to skin pigment and is not dirt as is often thought).

 Inflammation may develop around the blocked pores. A bacterium (germ) called P.acnes lives and multiplies in the sebum of blocked pores. Inflammation is due to the immune system reacting to these bacteria and to some chemicals in the blocked sebum that leak into the surrounding skin tissue. This leads to skin redness and larger spots forming (pustules, nodules and cysts).

The face, arms, back, neck and chest are the common areas affected. This is where the sebaceous glands are largest. Inflamed acne spots eventually heal but acne leave small scars.

 Acne is not caused by poor hygiene. In fact many people with acne wash more than usual, they think that extra washing will help (but unfortunately it won't).

 Chocolate, fried foods, sweets or other foods do not cause acne, but a healthy diet is very impor-

 Acne is not contagious and is not just a simple skin infection.

What makes acne worse?

 Some contraceptive pills may make acne worse. This is due to the hormones in some pills.

The hormone changes around the female monthly period may

cause a flare-up of spots.

Stress is said to make acne worse in some people but this is difficult to prove.

 Thick, greasy make-up may possibly make acne worse. Makeup can be worn to cover spots but it is best to use non-greasy makeup and not to cover the face with foundation.

• Picking and squeezing the spots may cause further inflammation and scarring.

Sweating heavily such as in hot humid countries or hot work may make acne worse. The extra sweat possibly contributes to blocking pores.

 Spots may develop under tight clothes such as headbands, tight bra straps, tight collars, etc. This is possibly due to increased sweat-

ing under tight clothing.

 Some medicines can make acne worse. For example, some medication for epilepsy and steroid creams and ointments often used for eczema. Do not stop a prescribed medicine but discuss with a doctor if you suspect one is making things worse.

Anabolic steroids (taken illegally by some body-builders) can

make acne worse.

What is the aim of treatment for acne?

The aim of treatment is to clear spots as much as possible and prevent scarring. Treatments are usually effective if taken properly. They will usually clear most spots but there is no treatment that will clear the skin perfectly. There are different types of treatment that work in different ways including the following.

Unplugging the blocked pores.

•Killing or reducing bacteria in the sebum and skin.

Reducing skin inflammation.

Preventing sebum being made.

 A combination of two or more of these effects.

What are the treatment options for acne?

A doctor will advise on which treatment is best. This may depend on the severity and type of acne. For example, a topical treatment that works by unplugging pores may be advised if the acne is mainly blackheads and whiteheads with little inflammation. If skin inflammation develops then a treatment that reduces inflammation may be advised. The following are the main

treatment types.

 Topical treatments - gels, lotions and creams are used for mild acne. They may also be used in combination with other treatments for moderate or severe acne. Different preparations work in different ways but many have three actions - reduces bacteria, reduces inflammation and help to unplug pores. Some topical treatments come in different strengths. A low strength is often advised first as topical treatments sometimes cause skin irritation.

Antibiotics - are commonly

prescribed for moderate or severe acne - Antibiotics kill the bacteria in the spots and reduce inflammation. A 3-6 month course will usually clear most spots, but many need to be continued for over one year. They are very safe.

 Isotretinoin - is a medicine that reduces the amount of sebum made by the skin glands. It is usually effective for severe acne. It may be advised only after other treatments have been tried without success. This is because there are possible serious side effects.

• Hormone treatment - one type of contraceptive pill (dianette) contains hormones that help reduce acne. This may be prescribed for women with acne who also want contraception.

How long is treatment needed for?

Whatever treatment is used, it is normal to take 2-3 months for any improvement to be noticed and up to three to eight months for most spots to clear. The most common reason why treatments fail is because some people think that treatment is not working after a month or so and give up. It takes time for the inflammation to settle and fresh healthy skin to come through. Do persevere with any treatment for at least two to three months before deciding if it is working or not. If there is no improvement after three months of taking a treatment regularly and correctly, do not despair. A change to a different or more powerful treatment will usually be advised and is likely to work.

Acne commonly flares up again if treatment is stopped when the spots have cleared. Treatment may have to be taken for quite some time to stop acne flaring up again. A lower 'maintenance' dose is usually sufficient. It is common to need to take treatment for 4-5 years to

keep acne away. In some people, ten or more years of treatment is needed to keep acne away.

Some other points about acne

 Sun beds and sunbathing will not help acne.

• Wash the skin with normal soap and water. Do not wash more than normal (twice a day is usual). Do not scrub the skin harshly. Excess washing and scrubbing may cause more inflammation and possibly make acne worse. Antiseptic washes are heavily advertised but are unlikely to make any difference.

 You may prefer not to treat mild acne that is not inflamed (blackheads, whiteheads and mild pimples). Mild acne is common and usually goes in time without scarring. However, inflamed acne can scar. If this develops it is best to seek treatment early to prevent scarring.

 Anxiety and depression are more common in people with acne. Do tell a doctor if you feel anxious or depressed about your acne.

In summary

Acne is common but is usually treatable. Treatment needs to be taken for several months to clear spots. Inflamed acne needs to be treated early to prevent scarring. Once the spots are gone, treatment may still need to be taken for several years to keep acne away

There are two ways of approaching this modern recipe. Either think about the cream and worry about calories, saturated fats and excess sugar - or take a leaf out of history's book and appreciate this for the vitamin C content that will ward off colds and scurvy for a long time to come.

Ingredients

75g butter 225g crushed gingemuts 218g tin condensed milk ½ pint double cream juice and rind of four large limes or eight small ones

l Line 20cm loose bottomed tin

l Melt the butter. Add the biscuit crumbs and press into tin.

Whisk the other ingredients together until thick. Spoon over base. Chill. Serves 6-8.

NatWest Island Games Countdown Stanley Running Club prepares for Island Games

STANLEY RUNNING CLUB was founded in February 1990 by Sarah Dixon (now Allan.) Rory Coward and Michelle Jones.

Sessions all started with a warm up jog and stretches at the old gymnasium (now the site of Standard Chartered Bank.) The aim of the Club was simply to encourage people to run for enjoyment and fitness.

A series of races was organised to add a competitive edge. The first race, a three mile fun run, had 50 entrants, a very encouraging

In 1992 the Cape Pembroke half marathon was first organised, starting and finishing at Hillside Camp. A total of 150 entrants well deserved their finishers medals after running through rain and hail.

In 1997 the largest team of runners from the Falkland Islands to date attended the Island Games, this time in Jersey. Tracy and Hugh were joined by Tony Burnett. Trudi Clarke, Crispin Fisher and Boyd Watson.

In 1999 a second Race Series was added to the programme from January to April to provide extra competition for the athletes attending the Island Games in Gotland in June. The team consisted of Hugh and Tony plus David Fyfe and Megan Eggeling. The men also represented the Islands at the World Veteran Athletics Championships in July in Gateshead, England.

The 2001 team for the Island Games in the Isle of Man is yet to be finalised but our runners have been training hard and racing in the Spring Series and the forthcoming half marathon plus the 2001 Race Series leading up to the Games.

The short list of runners so far consists of Chris (Hawkie) Juffray (currently in the Fire Brigade in England and competing regularly in Mountain Biking competitions.) Ben Pointing (only 14 years old but already showing a great deal of talent plus commitment to training and racing.) David Fyfe. Sarah Allan, Tracy Porter and Megan

In addition to representing the Islands at the Island Games. Hugh Marsden has also represented the Islands at the Commonwealth Games in Canada in 1994 and Malaysia in 1998. Hugh has been a wonderful ambassador for the Falkland Island and an inspiration to Stanley Running Club but is not eligible to represent the Falkland Islands at the 2001 Island Games as he has not lived in the Islands for the previous twelve months or for a ten year period.



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

At war with Bradford

THE Falklands go to war with Bradford', according to the Yorkshire regional newspaper Telegraph & Argus. In a story that quotes liberally from the front page of last week's Penguin News, the paper tells of the Falklands Rural Business Association's proposal to market wool directly via the internet rather than through Bradford based merchants.

The proposal has infuriated Bradford merchants Holdsworth Ltd. and Falkland Wool Growers Ltd. who claim the initiative is not in the interest of farmers, but the RBA says "We have to keep up with the times." More news next week.

Trial ferry for Falkland Sound

FIVE thousand pounds has been approved by the Development Corporation Board for the conducting of a trial ferry service between Port Howard and Port San Carlos by a local boat owner.

It appears likely that Polar Ltd. will be the company involved should the trial go ahead. The idea for a relatively cheap experiment involving a small vessel originated from Polar Ltd., however a spokesperson for the company said although they had presented costings for a trial to FIDC the idea was still. "...all very up in the air." She said it was still being looked into with regard to. ... "if it could be done, and if it could, who would do it."

A fully operational ferry service between East and West Falk-land may be several years away but in the meantime FIDC say they have been considering options to develop an interim solution to move people and freight across the Sound.

The service would be able to carry up to ten passengers and up to three tonnes of freight in either direction and the boat would probably be based at Port Howard.

The risks and potential benefits of the operation would be jointly shared between the owner and FIDC; marketing would be the responsibility of FIDC/FITB.

The target markets are mainly

military, local and VFR (visiting friends and relatives) tourism sectors, and FIDC hope that these people will travel more frequently as a result of lower prices and more flexible times, for example a Friday and Sunday evening service.

day and Sunday evening service.

According to General Manager
FIDC Richard Baker, "It is proposed to produce a promotional
brochure detailing the activities,
accommodation and other service
options available on the West as a
means of increasing the volume of
traffic through this route."

traffic through this route."

He said, "The funding for the project is to come from the self-catering cottage improvement scheme which has had fewer applications than forecast."

PERSONALLY I'm not a great fan of the activities provided by the average leisure centre. I am shamefully unable to achieve any satisfaction from pounding up and down a swimming pool with lukewarm water splashing in my ears. neither am I interested in bashing a small yellow sponge back and forth over a

But in my defence. I am one of that generation of 'in betweens' who missed the reasonable gymnasium facilities and activities on offer in Stanley back in the fifties and sixties, and I had already formed my leisure habits before the building of the new sports centre in the eighties. In fact as far as I can remember. my favourite pre-teen leisure activity involved passing handfuls of pebbles to my older brother so that he might bounce them off my next door neighbour's roof and into her chicken run.

Filling a washing up liquid bottle with water and squirting it on the windscreen of passing Land Rovers was another good one - the resulting panic stricken expression of the drivers and the veering of the vehicle across the road offered many a happy moment to Falklands youngsters.

But I am not alone in my almost imperceptible interest in sport, there are others of a similar age and older, who like me can barely control a shudder when donning anything resembling an Adidas stripe. So perhaps it was that lack of sporting encouragement in the past which explains why "the large majority of the people using the centre are expatriates as opposed to Islanders "(Leisure Centre Best Value PN December 3). It might be that because many Islanders simply did not have the opportunity to form modern attitudes to some sporting activities, they have not passed them on to their children

Thankfully the school does take a pro-active approach in this area, and it was also pleasing to see the extra children's activities on offer at the leisure centre for this summer holiday

Another forward thinking move is the establishment of a 'best value' group to review the leisure centre, and in answer to their question 'how should we charge for the use of facilities,' surely children and young teenagers might be allowed free entry to the swimming pool and other relevant activities. Give me one good reason why we should put anything at all in their paths that might prevent them forming the right habits at an early age?

It is imperative that the Falkland Islands Government gives the leisure centre the budget it needs to forge ahead. It must also, as has been suggested by the committee, fund staff training and offer attractive salaries to those who undertake it: trained staff could then offer increased activities.

Ethically there is no good reason why the leisure centre should not be heavily subsidised. Why should its primary role not involve contributing to the greatest degree that it can, to the health of the residents of these Islands?

Facility charges are only one of the issues being raised by the 'Best Value' committee. They also ask, should there be a creche (in my opinion - absolutely); how do we encourage usage, and should it be run separately from the education department (yes, if it cuts bureaucracy and allows the manager to make changes more rapidly). The committee is asking for your opinions so make sure it hears them.

Postal rate subsidy for a tailers?

SOME kind of assistance with postal charges may in the future be given to small businesses who use the website to sell their goods over-

According to a spokesperson for the Falkland Islands Development Corporation three options are being examined

These are:

• the use of a distribution centre in Britain or the USA.

 organising an outward route through Chile.

subsidising the postal rate.

She explained, however, that the second option would involve a number of problems, in particular that it would involve the Chilean post office reorganising their system for only a small volume of freight

The idea was discussed at the meeting of the Falkland Islands Development Corporation Board on Tuesday, following the presentation of a discussion paper by Councillor Norma Edwards.

The paper explained that she had been approached by one of her constituents. Mrs Rosemary Wilkinson who was concerned that, "...if one of the aims of the proposed new portal website is to aid the sale of Falkland goods abroad, the current postal rates for small airmail packages would have to be urgently addressed.

At present the cost of sending a small packet (up to 2Kg) by surface mail is £10.20 from the Falklands to anywhere in the world.

Surface small packets currently travel by air as far as England. which means that exporting that far is relatively cheap. However, exports elsewhere are either painfully slow (8-12 weeks) or too expensive for low value items such as woolly goods or wool yarn.

Councillor Edwards explained "To send a large parcel on to the



States or Canada, where the main market is - incurs a forward charge from England of £3.54 per parcel plus £1.55 per kilo. There is no half kilo increment in the rates as is the case in New Zealand or Australia.

"This means a huge jump in price of £5.55 per kilo if a large parcel exceeds a "neat" kilo-multiple."

She said if people could ship by air it would mean a huge boost to businesses for export of their craftwork, souvenirs or other items.

Councillor Edwards added, "I think it is important to try and solve these very real problems before the Website is set up, otherwise when people encounter the problems that the Wilkinsons have had (they have set up their own website without any help) and undoubtedly they will, it is likely that a lot of disillusion will be the end result for small businesses who want to export and an inability to meet the postage

£20,000 approved for seaweed project

TWENTY thousand pounds has been approved by the FIDC Board for the development of the calcified seaweed programme.

£1.480.80 of those funds will be used to carry out tests on calcified seaweed samples.

According to an FIDC staff paper, in order to provide information relevant to the possible highervalue uses of calcified seaweed material from various sources in the islands, a series of tests have been

commissioned.

These test will provide detailed chemical analyses of the samples coupled with information on protein, fibre, amino acid, carbohydrates and dry matter content.

The paper says, "The results

should allow us to determine whether we have the potential to develop an export market for calcified seaweed into sectors where the specific properties of our product can attract a premium price."

Rural seminar planned for January

•to examine the current status of key projects in rural development such as Branding, the abattoir, pasture improvements, wool marketing and the tourism strategy.

 to agree objectives for rural development.

●to consider how FIDC/DoA and FLH activities can be coordinated

to agree on the mechanisms and procedures for implementing a rural development strategy.

Jetty drivers face prosecution

A REMINDER about the illegality of driving on the Public Jetty has been issued by the Royal Falkland Islands Police.

According to a police spokesman. "With the return of the tourist season to the Falklands and with the safety of pedestrians and motorists in mind, the Royal Falkland Islands Police wish to notify the general public that the driving of motor vehicles on the Public Jetty is prohibited

This prohibition has not been enforced in recent years but due to the increased activity in the area at the head of the Public Jetty, during the construction of the visitors centre, and in light of recent experience, officers will move on all vehicles that they find parked on the Jetty in the future.

All vehicle operators will find that facilities have been provided to the east of the new centre where pedestrians from visiting vessels can reach them through a specially constructed walk way on the sea front. The use of these facilities will considerably reduce the conflict between normal road users. and pedestrians during cruise vessel visits

"It should be noted that this prohibition will be enforced at all times and not just during cruise vessel visits. The Royal Falkland Islands Police looks forward to the cooperation of all motorists.

Dave DAREs Falklands children

LEADING Police Constable (LPC) David Roberts is a man with a mission: to help equip children to face pressures in life.

He returned to the Islands last month after completing a Drug Abuse Resistance Course (DARE)

According to LPC Roberts. DARE is a. ".. drug abuse resistance education programme, started in the USA in 1983. It was piloted as a scheme to introduce Police Officers into schools to reduce crime and drug abuse in the USA." course aims to teach 9-11 year old children to resist drugs and violence

LPC Roberts was introduced to DARE whilst attending a crime prevention course in 1996. He explained, "I started to do some information gathering myself over the internet and through books. I started seriously looking into it. looking for funding, about two With help from the years ago." FCO who funded his training and the Argos Award which funded his training materials, LPC Roberts underwent the course in October and November.

LPC Roberts explained the importance of the seventeen week programme in reinforcing the self esteem of children. He said, 'Many children don't understand that they have rights and the programme is aimed to change that. We will talk about pressure, not just peer pressure but media pressure and indirect pressure. We are giving them the tools and confidence to say no, there are other

"We will involve them in role playing, which is fun and educational. It is giving them a sterile environment to practise saying no in. We'll give them eight different ways to say no; it's all to avoid difficult situations and to teach them life skills and boost self confidence.

"It's a programme I know will work.

LPC Roberts answered criticism he had faced locally saying. "A lot of people have already said to me 'we don't have drugs on the Islands' but how many people abuse alcohol? How many people abuse cigarettes and other tobacco

LPC Roberts with assistant Daren products? Drug abuse resistance education isn't only about drugs.

LPC Roberts stressed the need for commitment required for the programme to be a success: "It's a partnership; schools, police and parents. It's all three of us working together.

I expect commitment from the students in the school. A letter will be given to the children to sign and for the parents to read. The children will be given a work book to take home for parents to hopefully flick through. If parents have any questions I have no reservations about them calling me at home or at work

"In January we will be holding a meeting with parents of Year 6 and Year 7 students to discuss the programme.

At the end of the seventeen weeks, a course graduation is held. However, participants must work hard for their graduation certificate. LPC Roberts explained, "They have to have good attendance, stay drug free and stay out of trouble to pass. If I hear a student has been smoking, it can make it awkward to decide if they will graduate. It is not something they will receive just because they at-

Assisting LPC Roberts on his campaign is Daren, his cute and cuddly companion. According to LPC Roberts, Daren is the mascot of the DARE programme: "He's the guy who cares about kids. We use him as a teaching aid to avoid being too personal. Issues can be directed at him instead.

LPC Roberts and Daren will begin the DARE programme in January 2001.

£200 rent unreasonable says Burnerd

PHILOMEL STORE owner Burnerd Peck is continuing his fight to save his Stanley shop.

Mr Peck has been threatened with eviction from his prime sea front site due to non payment of rent

Mr Peck claims that because his father Desmond built the store in the 1950's the store is rightfully his and he should not have to pay rent. Mr Tomlinson left the Islands in the mid 60's and returned to the UK.

Better interaction with next of kin?

ON Saturday I had the opportunity to travel to the Islands from Buenos Aires, together with the group of relatives of the Argentine soldiers who fell during the war, the so-called next of kin group.

Twenty relatives, a priest and a co-ordinator from the Argentine Foreign Office came on the visit, the seventeenth of its kind.

The experience was very interesting for me, an outside observer, as I joined them in Rio Gallegos for a city tour and a barbecue offered by the local association of war veterans. Some very emotional speeches were given by those who fought in the war next to their beloved ones.

These ceremonies, however touching, do not give way for a positive reconciliation with the past. The fallen ones were always referred to as the heroes of a lost battle. And it was always pointed out that, "the struggle still contin-ues" and, "we will come back." The militaristic mysticism was always present, and criticism of those who led us to war was carefully avoided. The evident fact that this war was absolutely unnecessary was never mentioned. Perhaps it makes it easier for the next of kin, but living inside this fiction does not give much way for coming to terms with reality

When they arrive in the Falklands they find themselves a bit lost, in a place where people don't speak their language about whom they have very mixed and contradictory feelings. "Are these the enemy?" "Should I hate these people?" English is as unintelligible for them as Chinese and the Union Jack is identified as an unfriendly symbol.

They wander around town, getting a feel for the place but the opportunities they have to establish meaningful communication with locals are almost null. Their emotional knowledge of the Falkland Islanders remains shallow. Or worse, it remains distorted.

The main purpose of the visits is very well served, they all come back comforted, feeling closer to their loved ones after having visited their graves. But they return home just as ignorant as they were in respect to the people of the Falkland Islands.

Having made these observations on what I experienced on Saturday. I put forward the following proposal, which will not only serve the quality of the time the next of kin spend in the Falklands, but also the understanding in Argentina of the spirits of the people who live here, their tribulations, their hopes and fears. This proposal will also give way to a truer reconciliation with the past. It will replace the unsettling, "We will come back!" with a more accurate and realistic, "What happened was completely unnecessary." This is what comes from mutual understanding, mutual respect. But in order for this to happen, the existing bridges should be improved.

My proposal is simply to create a commission of Spanish speaking people in Stanley which could organise some kind of event. a gathering or two, with open attendance, where people would feel free to talk to each other, ask and answer questions. It is very simple, it is people speaking and understanding each other. It would be natural that some strong emotions come up in these meetings, so they should be carefully handled but both the next of kin and the Falklands community would have a lot to gain from such interaction. Don't you think so?



Constitutional change - Arthur Donahoe QC talks to Penguin News

SECRETARY General of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) Mr Arthur Donahoe QC undertook a week of engagements in Stanley and the Camp last

Visiting from Canada, Mr Donahoe was invited by councillors to Falklands so that they might benefit from his experience of constitutional change.

Mr Donahoe met with councillors and members of the public before talking to the press prior to

his departure.

Speaking to Lisa Riddell he explained that his background is in law, having practised in Halifax. Nova Scotia for fourteen years before being elected in 1978 to the Nova Scotia Legislature. Between 1981 and 1991 he was Speaker of the Flouse.

Mr Donahoe later returned to law, and in 1992 was chosen to be the Secretary General of the CPA.

Mr Donahoe said, "During that time I developed a keen interest in constitutional matters and in legislature, parliaments and how they function and operate. This has given me a fair amount of experience in how constitutions operate and how legislatures function. As a result I think that it was felt by councillors that I might be able to make a modest contribution to the (constitutional review) process in the Falklands.

Q. As part of the constitutional review process councillors have laid out areas for public debate. Do you agree with councillors that the areas identified by them need to be changed - or do you feel they are going too far?

Ans. The Falklands had a review of its constitution not too many years ago, and a constitutional review is one that should be undertaken every once in a while; but it doesn't have to be done constantly. I think there has been a feeling that when the last review was made there were some areas that might have been dealt with but were not. There was also the request from the UK Foreign and Commonwealth Office to all the overseas territories to conduct a review of their constitutions, and in response to that the current review was commenced.

So, I think that basically the council has identified those areas that do bear looking at. One thing that is interesting is that in the process of reviewing the constitution a number of areas have been identified where there seems to be a considerable body of thought that change is required but does not require a change in the constitution. So one result of that process may be some constitutional change and some other changes made short of constitutional amendments

O. One area identified by councillors involves the questionable efficiency of the relationship between the General Purposes Committee, Legisla-

tive Council and Executive Council. What are your thoughts on this relationship - does it work as it should?

Ans. The way in which I approach my involvement in this process is from a series of principles that should be applied in democratic societies, and two of those important principles are 'openness' and 'accountability

One thing I have detected since I have been here is a very, very widely held view that the current process under which decisions are taken behind closed doors, with the General Purposes Committee, is not the proper way for things to happen. If anything has come through to me with a degree of unanimity it is that attitude by people here in the Islands.

So the short answer to your question is that it is likely that one of the things I will be recommending is to move away from that system of functioning.

Q. And the concepts of councillors having more ministerial roles and there being greater political leadership - what are your views?

Ans. Again. I think there is a widely held view that this should happen and again this is an area where there does not have to be constitutional change. This is because the current constitution provides for the appointment of three members of Legislative Council to the Executive Council and as the Attorney General and others have pointed out it does not require a constitutional change to give these three people Executive or portfolio responsibilities.

The feeling is that this would increase accountability. The problem would be that it would be inevitable that these three people would have to spend more of their time carrying out their duties and the there is a feeling that it might be difficult to find people willing to make that commitment.

But I think that this is a problem that would have to be addressed and hopefully there would be people willing to run for Legislative Council who would be able to go beyond that and make the commitment to be involved to a larger degree.

Q. But do you feel personally that this consensus style government that we currently have works reasonably well?

Ans. It seems to work in a fashion but I am not so sure it works in the right way. Yes, you can have decisions taken behind closed doors and things will happen and things will work but it has created a situation in which there is the feeling that, "...we didn't have any input into that decision," or ,"...that decision wasn't publicly discussed." So that is the point that I am trying to make that the openness that should be there is absent when you have a system that sees decisions taken behind closed doors. So I would hope that there

will be a move away from that way of functioning.

Q. There is also the idea of having a single constituency rather than the division between Camp and Stanley - do you consider this a good idea?

Ans. I have not come to final conclusion on that. I have heard strong arguments both in favour of it and what are felt to be strong practical arguments against it and this is something I am going to have to give some thought to before I come to some conclusions. What I may do in this instance is propose a number of alternatives.

One conclusion that I think I have reached is that if a decision was to be taken to move to a single constituency then the process of conducting the election should be

changed.

I do not think it is right that you should have a single constituency and then elect members on a 'first past the post' basis. I think there should be (if there is to be a single constituency) and again I would stress the word "if", the election process should be by some form of a proportional representation or a preferential vote.

I have a feeling that if this is examined properly and done properly. it would be possible to put in place a voting system that while it would not give an absolute guarantee it would virtually ensure that there would be representation on the council for Camp

I know that there is a concern in the Camp about whether moving to a single constituency would then rob them of having representatives on the Legislative Council and this is one area that I am going to look at very closely and try to come to some conclusions about.

Q. What kind of feedback did you get from discussions with Islanders - do people generally support the idea of constitutional change or are they indifferent?

Ans. I don't detect any great ground-swell in favour of sweeping changes. But I think there is a feeling very widely held that some modifications of the way things are done would provide the Falklands with a more open and more accountable government.

Everybody to whom I have spoken is aware of the issues that are being considered in this process and the ones I have talked to have all expressed views on various matters that are being debated now - sometimes very differing views - but people know what is going on and this is one thing I have found about the Falklands that people are extremely well informed about what is happening here and what everybody else is

Q. So you approve of the councillors programme for the constitutional review process?

Ans. I have heard some views expressed that it has not allowed for enough public input but my observation has been that the council has opened the process up.

There have been opportunities for people who are interested to present their views, and there will be a further opportunity for people to do so when the draft report is presented in February or March of next year.

In areas of constitutional change I think it is important that there be as much opportunity as possible for public input. So my observation is that there has been that opportunity - but I suppose it is for people here to say whether there that opportunity has been extensive enough. I am encouraged by the fact that there will still be further opportunities for people to express their thoughts.

Battle Day parade 2000

BRIGHT sunshine and a sparkling blue sea complemented the colourful uniforms on show at this year's Battle Memorial ceremony

The short service which commemorates the victory of the naval engagements of December 8, 1914 followed a ceremony led by the Reverend Alistair McHaffie held in Christ Church Cathedral. The service was attended by detachments of the Royal Navy and the Falkland Islands Defence Force. His Excellency the Governor, the Commander British Forces Falkland Islands and other Senior Officers of the British Forces representing the three services serving here in the Islands.

The cathedral service remembered the six British sailors and others who died later from injuries received during the battle between the British and German fleet. 2.260 German sailors also lost their lives as a result of the

At around 10.15 the Royal Naval detachment from HMS Dumbarton Castle and members of the FIDF marched to the battle memorial where waited the RAF College and the RAF College and the flower lawns. waited the RAF College Band. Also present were various youth organisations, representatives of such groups as the Red Cross and the Royal British Legion, members of the Legislative Council and a large gathering of members of the public.

Once the parade was assembled the Governor Mr Donald Lamont arrived and inspected the two detachments accompanied by the Commander British Forces.

Following prayers, wreaths were laid at the base of the imposing Battle Memorial before a fly past by military aircraft and helicopters. Adding to the picturesquescene a number of small yachts, some flying flags. bobbed in the harbour below the memorial.
The Governor then left the me-morial and took the salute from a dais at the entrance gates to the Govern-

COMMEMORATING "BATTLE DAY"

BATTLEDAY ceremonies in the Falkland Islands and in London this weekend (December 8th and 9th) commemorate the Battle of the Falkland Islands on 8th December, 1914. Wreaths are laid every year at the Battle Memorial in Stanley and at the Cenotaph in the heart of London.

They recall a significant date in the early months in the First World War when the Royal Navy inflicted one of the most devastating defeats in its long history upon an enemy fleet, in which 2,260 German sailors lost their lives, for the loss of only six British on the day itself and several more who died later from wounds.

The battle ended a German attempt to destroy the Royal Navy's base facilities and possibly to occupy the Falkland Islands, by the Kaiser's crack East Asiatic Squadron, commanded by Vice Admiral Graf Von Spee.

Fresh from destruction of two heavy British cruisers and their crews totalling 1,600 men, off the Chilean Coast, the German Squadron sailed full speed to the Falkland Islands, believing there would be no resistance.

They were astonished to discover that a British squadron commanded by Vice Admiral Sir Doveton Sturdee had got there the previous day after a dramatic 8,000-mile (13,000 kilometre) dash in total radio silence. His ships, already drawn up for battle in the natural harbours of the Falkland Islands, caught the Germans totally by surprise, sinking four of the five German cruisers, including the flagship Scharnhorst, killing Admiral Graf Von Spee, his two sons and all 700 crew. Only the light cruiser Dresden escaped, to be pursued and later sunk in the South Pacific.

It was a battle which had echoes in the Second World War, again in December, in 1939, when the Battle of the River Plate ended with the scuttling of the powerful battleship, Graf Von Spee, named after the First World War Admiral. The battleship, which sank several British merchant vessels in the early weeks of the war, had been fought to a standstill and forced to take refuge in Montevideo by the Royal Navy's Falklands flotilla of three smaller warships

- Ajax, Exeter and Achilles. Harold Briley, London

SHEEP DISEASE IN MAGALLANES

MAGALLANES farmers are concerned about the appearance of several cases of a rare disease that attacks mainly adult sheep, known as Maedi Visna, generating a persistent and progressive terminal infection.

According to Chilean sanitary officials in Punta Arenas and the Magallanes Farmers Association, Maedi Visna represents no risk for humans, but debilitates 2 to 4 year old ewes limiting their reproductive conditions and endangering lambs because the disease generally comes with mastitis

Carlos Rowland from the Magallanes Regional Veterinary Services said that some of the sheep detected are of European origin, the Spanish breed "latxa", while others belong to a new crossbred Milchschaf, that was introduced from Argentina. Some local Corriedale crossed with these high production breeds also have the symptoms of the disease.

Mr. Rowland and Mr. Pablo Sapunar, president of the Magallanes have appeared in the local media requesting farmers to immediately contact sanitary authorities if they suspect or believe there are infected animals in their flocks.

Meantime sanitary officials are visiting all farmers with latxa and milchschaf breeds to take blood samples and elaborate an epidemiological chart of Magallanes and Tierra del Fuego.

According to the extent of the disease, and the number of farms infected, authorities could go as far as ordering the eradication of all sheep, and goats, with a positive Maedi Visna serological reaction.

"NO BLIND SHEEP"

RUMOURS sheep becoming blind as a result of UV radiation and the world headlines indicating that Punta Arenas was fully exposed to the ozone hole for the first time last October, have been nonsensed.

Professor Claudio Casiccia head of the Magallanes University, Umag, atmospheric laboratory who has been researching the ozone hole for

the last ten years indicated to the local press that, "There's no scientific evidence to back the blind sheep story that began in 1992, and Punta Arenas was effectively fully under the ozone hole for the first time in 1992, and not this year as was published all round the world".

Professor Casiccia said that Umag has been working with Brazilian assistance since 1990 when, "...they first supplied us with a 200,000 US dollar Brewer MX-IV to check UV radiation and let us help them with their pilot balloon experiences to keep track of the ozone hole."

"Actually Brazilians have been researching the ozone layer for over a decade, and they have been very generous to us, the pilot balloon project has an annual cost of 100,000 US dollars and each balloon, 1,500 US dollars", revealed Professor Casiccia, adding that Umag concentrates information from a network of stations in Punta Arenas, Natales, Puerto Williams and Porvenir.

"All we can say at the moment is that we have an extraordinary data bank on the ozone hole thanks to the Brazilians, and that October and November are crucial and highly dangerous months for humans exposed to the sun particularly in Punta Arenas," concluded Prof. Casiccia.

CENTRAL AMERICA BACKS MALVINAS CLAIM

CENTRAL American countries meeting in Costa Rica to decide con regional integration, openly backed Argentina's territorial integrity claim over the Falklands, and insisted in the need that Argentina and United Kingdom, "rapidly resume sovereignty talks.

According to Argentine press agency Telam, the official statement followed a meeting between Argentine President Fernando De la Rúa and the heads of government of Central America, Dominican Republic and Belize.

The statement expresses the, "...need that both countries resume, as soon as possible, negotiations leading to a quick

solution to the sovereignty dispute over the question of the Islas Malvinas".

President De la Rúa in his closing speech was particularly grateful that the talks should include "the principle of territorial integrity."

The Central American summit in its final release also included a "peace and democracy" binding clause, suggested by President De la Rúa and which is similar to the one enforced in Mercosur since

COBRA HELICOPTERS FOR ARGENTINA

THE Argentine Army is planning an air tactical quick reaction brigade with a basic structure of 4 to 6 American built Cobra helicopters, depending on current budget equipment provisions and American special purchasing conditions.

Each Cobra helicopter has a basic cost of 15 million US dollars, but Argentine Army Commander in Chief Major General Ricardo Brinzoni expects the US, "To supply us with transport, and other type of helicopters, including Cobra."


However Major General Brinzone said it all depends on budget provisions, which "are not up to our demands and will force us to reduce training programs and the number of servicemen the coming financial year".

Major General Brinzone added that even if the Cobra operation does not advance, "we'll acquire 10 to 12 more traditional helicopters, but the quick reaction air tactical brigade will be a reality in 2001".

The new air brigade will include Air Attack Battalion 601, Commando Companies 601 and 602, a reconnaissance company and a Light Artillery Group.

Further on the Argentine Army Commander said that there are no immediate plans to integrate a Mercosur quick reaction force, but "relations between our regional forces are excellent and we can't discard that possibility".

LAMPREIA, VICTIM OF CHILE'S DECISION?

BRAZLIAN political analysts believe that Foreign Minister Luiz Felipe Lampreia could end up as a victim of Chile's recent decision to begin talks with the United States over a free trade

A spokesman for the Foreign Minister in Brasilia said that "officially there's nothing to comment.

However Lampreia who is one of two remaining ministers who has served President Henrique Cardoso since 1995. is believed to be preparing his departure in the coming weeks, responding to an attractive offer from a private institution, but the real reason could be an accumulation of what are considered "foreign policy blunders."

Above all the US-Chile's announcement of free trade talks was interpreted as a failure by Brazil in its attempt to bring chile into Mercosur as a full member.

Chile is already an associate member of Mercosur, and although Chileans have insisted they wish to participate in the political aspects of the South American block. Brazil has reacted to Chile's last move saying that talks on full Mercosur membership, scheduled as top of the list in this week's Florianopolis presidential summit agenda, were off at least for a year.

However not all members have reacted the same way: Argentina in a more cautious attitude began contacts with Chilean officials and said that "a reflection period" is needed, while Uruguayan president Jorge Batlle applauded the

Chilean initiative.

"They will help speed up the trade talks with Nafta countries," declared opensly President Batlle.

Actually Chile's original target has always been Nafta, but when US Congress blocked President Clinton's "fast track" request in 1995, Chileans turned to Mercosur as a second best option.

Brazil's policy has been to reinforce Mercosur before beginning talks with the United States and Nafta associates.

PUNTA ARENAS COUNCIL TAKES OFFICE PUNTA ARENAS city Mayor Juan Morano and the seven Legislative Councillors took office this week promising to combat unemployment and create new jobs.

Mr Morano said the town government must be run with the efficiency of the private sector and requested support from the Councillors to address education and public health issues, underlining that, "...we are all public servants," and must be, "...dedicated to the community."

Several members of the incoming Council, with a clear majority for the ruling Chilean Christian Democrat-Socialist coalition insisted in the need to create public works jobs with the double purpose of helping fight unemployment and taking basic services to many areas of the city.

One of the independent Councillors said that it was essential that Punta Arenas' economy begins to grow at least at the same rate as national level, "...that is the only real long term solution unemployment."

Punta Arenas Mayor and Council have a four years mandate.

"BIOTOXINE" KILLS **PENGUINS**

government of the Argentine province of Chubut reported that the most probable cause of death of 2,500 penguins found strewn along the beaches of this Patagonian territory was a "biotoxine" which originated in a shoal of anchovies.

According 10 Conservation Secretary of the Provincial Tourist Board Nestor Garcia, "A bitoxine seems the most probable cause, following tests done in the Patagonian Research Laboratory.'

Besides the Patagonian Laboratory, the outbreak is

being studied by marine biologists from the Patagonia University and the New York Zoological Society.

Apparently the phenomenon could last up to a month and has only been confirmed among adult penguins that feed well into the sea, and not in the rookeries.

"This is why biologists conclude that the most probable cause is some toxine in the anchovies," said Mr Garcia adding that the autopsies indicated severe damage in the liver and brains of the penguins. However American researchers said this was not uncommon.

ROYAL NAVY UPDATES SEAWOLF MISSILE

A £ 260 million contract for a mid-life update of the Royal Navy's Seawolf missile system has been awarded to Alenia Marconi Systems, (AMS), and its subcontractors in the United Kingdom, Defence Procurement, Minister Baroness Symons announced last Friday.

Baroness Symons said it was excellent news both for the Royal Navy and British industry since the contract will secure over a thousand jobs.

"The Seawolf short range air defence system, fitted to the Royal Navy's Type 22 and Type 23 frigates was battle proven in the Falklands and Gulf campaigns. The mid-life update will bring improved system performance, keeping Sea-wolf at the forefront of ship missile system technology and allow it to meet emerging threats well into the future," said Baroness Symons.

The importance of the new MOD's "Smart Acquisition" principles at work was also underlined by Baroness Symons, "the MOD integrated project team has been working closely with industry to deliver this contract at an affordable price whilst meeting the requirements of the Royal Navy."

It is estimated that the contract will create or sustain jobs in AMS Chelmsford, Portmouth, Bristol plants plus those in sub contractors for supporting equipment.

POVERTY IN CHILE

ALMOST 22% of the Chilean population, equivalent to 3,160,000 people and 18% of homes, live in poverty according to a biannual Casen poll for Mideplan, independent organisation that keeps track of social and economic conditions in Chile.

The poll which started in 1985, splits the Chilean population in five income groups, each of them representing 20%, and defines poverty when a person has a monthly income of less than 75 US dollars, (city dwellers) and less than 55 US dollars in the Camp.

However the Mideplan report also indicates that according to the last budget (1998), each Chilean poor household received government assistance equivalent to approximately 1,500 US dollars.

This includes direct cash

handouts (pensions, allowances, subsidies, etc.) plus services, meaning education, public health, drinking water,

But the report also indicates that the unemployment rate among the "poor" doubles Chile's national average. Similarly the illiteracy rate trebles the national average and education test results are dismally unsatisfactory.

Midean also points out that is spite of the fact that since the resumption of democracy in Chile (1990), the number of poor people and homes has been halved, the total money income of the 40% poorest Chileans remains practically stable at

ARGENTINE NUCLEAR

REACTOR IN AUSTRALIA AUSTRALIAN Nuclear Science and Technology Organisation, ANSTO, finally received approval to build an Argentine designed reactor for the production of cancer treating

nuclear medicines.

The building of the reactor in Sydney is now scheduled to begin next year, in spite of complaints from the Australian suppliers of radioisotopes.

The controversy broke out when ANSTO argued that the delay in making a final decision imperilled the normal supply of

nuclear medicines.

However Australia's main supplier Mallinckrodt, said that medical required could be radioisotopes successfully imported, and apparently has rushed approval in order to guarantee local demand

BETTER DOCKS

THE Chilean Austral Ports Company, EPA, will be investing a million US dollars in upgrading Punta Arenas harbour's two docks.

"Most of the money will be invested in improving the jetties but some will also be directed to increase storing capacity and access," said Fernando Castillo, General Manager of EPA. Mr Castillos revealed that a 10% increase in port activity is forecast for the coming year, which means, ... "we'll be able to triple the modest earnings of the current financial year after running two consecutive deficit. In 1999 Punta Arena harbour losses reached a quarter million US dollars."

However Mr Castillos pointed out the importance of EPA for Punta Arenas: "We pay national taxes equivalent to 200,000 US dollars and contribute directly to the local community with another 250000 US dollars."



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



General Practice by Dr Barry Elsby

Healthy Eating HEALTH problems such as heart disease, bowel cancer and obesity are more common in people who eat an unhealthy diet.

Changing to a more balanced 'healthy' diet will help reduce these health problems. Eating healthily means the following changes for many people.

Increase the amount of starchy type foods (complex carbohy-drates)

Starchy foods contain less calories than fatty food or alcohol. They are also usually high in fibre (roughage.) They also give a feeling of fullness (satiety) which helps to control appetite. Starchy foods such as bread, cereals, rice and pasta along with vegetables should provide the bulk of most meals. Tips include the following

· For each meal include generous portions of rice, pasta or bread.

Choose wholemeal bread and rolls. When baking, use at least 1/3 wholemeal flour

• For break fast have porridge or high fibre or wholemeal cereals (without sugar coating)

. Have tea breads and plain or fruit scones instead of cakes and biscuits that are high in sugar

Increase the amount of fruit, vegetables and nuts

At least five portions of fruit or vegetables are recommended each day. They are rich in vitamins and minerals which are needed to keep healthy. A diet rich in fruit and veg' lowers the chance of developing angina, a heart attack or a stroke. They have lots of fibre which helps to keep the bowels healthy so problems such as constipation and diverticular disease are less likely. People who eat lots of fruit and veg also have less chance of developing bowel and lung cancer. They are also filling but are low in calories so they are ideal to keep the weight in con-

One portion of fruit or vegetables is roughly equivalent to one larger fruit such as an apple, pear, banana, orange or two smaller sized fruits such as plums, satsumas or one cup of small fruits such as grapes, strawberries, chemies, raspberries or two or three tablespoons of fruit salad, stewed or canned fruit or one glass of fresh fruit juice (150 ml) or one tablespoon of dried fruit or a normal portion of any vegetable (about two tablespoons) or one desert bowl of salad. Some tips on how to increase fruit and vegetables in the diet include the following.

· Try some different types not tried before. The variety of tastes and textures available may be surprising. Juices, frozen, canned and dried varicties all count.

 Try adding chopped bananas, apples or other fruit to breakfast cereals.

· Main meals should aim to include at least two different vegetables. Do not over boil vegetables. Steaming, stir-frying or lightly boiling are preferable to retain the nutrients.

· Always offer fruit to accompany meals.

 How about tomatoes, carrot sticks, dried apricots or fruit as part of packed lunches?

• Fruit is great for snacks. Encourage children to snack with fruit rather than sweets.

Nuts have more calories than fruit. However, some evidence suggests that eating nuts regularly (any type) reduces the chance of developing heart disease. Five or more portions of nuts per week is thought to be most beneficial.

Eat more fibre (roughage) Fibre is part of food which is not

digested. It is filling but has no calories. It helps the bowels move regularly which reduces constipation and other bowel problems. It may also help lower the cholesterol level. The tips above to increase starchy foods. fruit and vegetables will also increase fibre. Drink plenty of fluids with a high fibre diet (at least 6-8 cups of fluid a day.)

Reduce the amount of fat in the diet

A low fat diet reduces the chance of developing heart problems such as angina and heart attacks. It will also help reduce weight. The total amount of fat should be low. Also, if fats are used, the type of fat is important. Saturated fats such as butter, lard, dripping and unspecified margarine are bad. Unsaturated fats such as corn oil, sunflower oil, olive oil and low fat spreads are better. Tips to reduce fat in the diet include the following.

· Whenever possible, do not fry food. Grill, bake, poach, barbecue, boiletc. If you do fry, use unsaturated oil which is changed regularly. Drain the oil off the food before eating.

· Choose lean cuts of meat and cut off any excess fat.

· Avoid adding unnecessary fat to food. For example, use low fat spreads and spread less on bread; measure out small portions of oil for cooking etc.

· Watch out for hidden fats that are found in pastries, cakes and biscuits.

· Buy lower fat milk, cheese, yoghurts and other dairy products rather than full fat varieties.

· Avoid cream. Use low fat salad cream or low fat yoghurt as a cream substitute

Eat less sugary foods

Sugary foods are high in calories and too much may cause weight gain. It isn't just the amount of sugar that may be bad. Small amounts such as sweets eaten as snacks are bad for the teeth too. Avoid them in between meals, especially at bed time. Tips include the following.

 Don't add sugar to tea, coffee and breakfast cereals. The taste for sweetness often changes with time. Use artificial sweeteners only if nec-

 Reduce sugar in any kind of recipe. Use fruit as an alternative to add sweetness to recipes.

· Try sugar free drinks. Give children water as their main drink rather than sweet drinks.


· If you eat chocolate or sweets, try and keep the quantity down. Eating them as part of a meal and then brushing teeth is better than between meals as snacks.

Reduce the amount of salt in the diet

Too much salt may increase the risk of developing high blood pressure. Gradually reduce the amount of salt in the diet. The taste for salt will eventually change. Use small amounts when cooking and don't add more salt at the table. Eat less prepacked foods, salt rich sauces, take aways and packet soups which are high in salt. Herbs and spices are alternatives to flavour food.

Keep alcohol within the recommended limits

Drinking heavily can damage some parts of the body such as the liver, brain, stomach, pancreas and heart. It can also cause high blood pressure. Alcohol contains a lot of



calories and too much can cause weight gain. Men should drink no more than 21 units of alcohol a week. Women should drink no more than 14 units a week. One unit of alcohol is equivalent to one glass of wine, half a pint of beer or one pub measure of spirits, not yours or my measures.

Recipes for the Falklands



Royal Bread and Butter Pudding By Elizabeth Villalon

"GIVE us our Daily Bread" is the prayer but what do you do with yesterday's? The sweet-toothed like to turn it into comfort puddings.

Royalty is no exception. HRH Prince Charles on request for, "your favourite recipe" issues this up-market version which is an improvement on the one with charcoal currants. It could be used as in the international representation of British cooking. The basic rule is bread, liquid, fruit and sweetener. If that translates into goat's milk, mulberries and honey, so be it. Serve with lashings of confidence and the local version of cream, safe in the knowledge that no one else will have eaten anything like this either!

Ingredients and method

1 Bread and butter to line the dish.

2 Raisins, currents, sultanas and slices of banana plus black treacle.

3 More bread and butter.

4 More raisins etc and continuing in layers until the top of the dish is reached.

5 Pour in about 1 pint of milk - perhaps more, as it needs to be 'wet.'

6 Pour in brandy to taste

7 Complete with bread and butter slices on top and sprinkle with cinna-

8 Cook for approximately 25 minutes, depending on how crispy you like the bread

9 Add lots of cream when serving.



Millennium Marathon to Remember

Report by Megan Eggeling THERE could not have been one of the sixty people intending to take part in the Cape Pembroke Half-marathon, who, on wakening, did not open the curtains with some trepidation to see what the weather was doing. The forecast was not good. And it was proved right!

Nevertheless, at 9.30 a valiant band of eleven walkers, suitably booted and back-packed, lined up at the Totem Pole with no other thought than to get round that lighthouse in the misty distance as quickly as possible and head westwards for the comfort and warmth of home. Their's was not really a race but with banks of grev menacing cloud and a long road ahead. they stepped out smartly enough. The forty-nine runners, somewhat more stylishly (and minimally!) clad, bounded away from the same start line 11/2 hours later.

It was straight into a wicked north wind up the incline towards the Cape turnoff and from then on slippery, clarty conditions threatened to tax even the most experienced of them. However, the first group of such athletes took it all in their stride and the eventual winner, Lee Keily, leading from the start, continued to stretch ahead with seeming ease, even graciously throwing out an encouraging word to the front little trio of walkers doggedly forcing their way up that never-ending stretch of road to the Dairy Paddock turnoff in the teeth of driving rain.

Running a marathon can be a lonely business when there's noone doing it at exactly your pace and local runner. David Fyfe, suffering from cramp (but no doubt preferring even these conditions to those of blisteringly hot Gotland) pushed himself hard to take second place in the Veteran (40+) category while, just less than 6 minutes behind him. 16 year old Marty Barnes, in this his first half-marathon, proved just what a talented runner he is. 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

Seven year driving disqualification for Stewart

A STANLEY man this week received two eight month prison sentences suspended for fifteen months, to run concurrently, and was disqualified from driving for seven years.

Robert Stewart had pleaded guilty in court on December 7 to a charge of failing to provide specimens of breath for testing and the other in relation to failing to provide specimens of breath for analysis. In court on December 20 Graham Cripps for the prosecution explained that Stewart had been

arrested on the MPA ring road on December 1 after information had been passed from the Stanley Police to the military police that the accused was travelling there having been turned away from work for being drunk. When arrested he failed to complete two breath tests on the road and later at the police station failed to provide breath for analysis.

At the time of the incident he had his partner, baby and young child in the vehicle.

In sentencing, Senior Magis-

trate Keith Watson, having listened to facts provided by Richard Marlor for the defence, noted that the defendant was in full time work for the first time in four years and said that he deemed the impact of imprisonment in this case would be far greater than normal. Additionally the family would be deprived of their income.

As well as the suspended sentence and driving disqualification Stewart was ordered to pay £170 prosecution costs.

ODDLY, when I first attempted to recall momentous happenings of this year as subject matter for an editorial absolutely nothing came to mind.

Presumably my brain was addled by pre-Christmas panic because just a little research revealed that we have not been short on relatively significant happenings this year (if not as high profile as last year's July Joint Statement) not least the first ever arrest of a poaching fishing vessel, the Her Ching 101, by the newly armed Falklands Patrol Vessel, Dorada

Of course we were all aware that this was an important event, but I was interested to hear from a recently visiting environmental journalist how intrigued much of the rest of the fishing world is by the concept of a community the size of small English village establishing, running and in particular protecting, their own fishing zone. Put like that I suppose it does seem rather odd but kind of impressive don't you think?

2000 was the year when we expected to become familiar with the new Argentine government's policies on the Falklands, but the full-on approach of Menem was replaced with the disdain of De La Rua, While some Islanders may prefer to see Argentina cold and distant it cannot be helpful to our Fisheries or Oil Department whose areas of responsibility are (due to shared sea boundaries) affected by Argentine attitudes and policies.

But at the very least, in contrast to the new Argentine government's antiquated approach to the problem. Falkland Islanders can only appear the more forward looking; and let's face it, there must be a few Islanders cheered by the fact that De La Rua hates the July 14 agreement almost as much as they do!

Also this year, high profile visitors were thick on the ground; various individuals advising on constitutional change. Secretary State for Defence Geoff Hoon. HRH Princess Alexandra but most controversially

ex Argentine Foreign Minister Guido Di Tella.

On the agricultural side, the FIDC/AgDept integration was proposed and went ahead, and FLH became a statutory corporation. No doubt arguments regarding whether sharing the same Board qualifies as the bodies having merged, integrated, amalgamated or unified will continue on into infinity

What else? Well Stanley continued to extend east, a restaurant opened. a family centre was established and on the down side a number of farmers were forced due to financial difficulties to leave their farms. Their year tailed off with what has all the appearances of a damp squib, the RBA driven proposal to cut out agents and merchants and sell wool directly from the Falklands.

There were of course many rather more personal events recorded between the pages of Penguin News, but most of the above formed our headline stories. Our thanks to all of those people who assisted us by providing information, often willingly, sometimes gleefully and occasionally reluctantly.



EDUCATION by Design, a Hampshire based design team headed by the Radley House Partnership, has won a contract to design the extension of the Infant and Junior School

The £2million project will double the school's existing floor area.

The design team consists of architects, Radley House Partnership, civil and structural engineers. Andrew Waring Associates, quantity surveyors, King Sumners Partnership, service engineers, RHB Partnership and landscape gardeners. North Haven Gardeners

The extension will provide three new classrooms; new accommodation for arts and crafts, cookery and science in a specifically designed General Purposes Room. a new purpose built Learning Resource Centre: a new Learning Support Centre and new administrative facilities

Camp Education will also be relocated in the new extension. Playground landscaping and traffic managementaround the school will complete the scheme.

The new school has been carefully designed to complement existing Falklands' architecture and will be constructed from traditional materials and building forms such as granite stone walling, timber boarding and brightly coloured curved metal roofs.

Bob Jarvis from Radley House Partnership, said: "The most significant architectural feature in the Falklands is its boldly coloured roofs and we will be following this tradition by giving the school a distinctive bright red roof, made from aluminium troughed sheeting. The striking design is also environmentally efficient and will require minimum maintenance.

Using colour and light to maximum effect, the designers wanted to create a fun and inspiring environment for children to learn in. Bollards in the shape of penguins, at the entrance to the school are an example of a fun safety feature designed to appeal to children.

The design team has been working on the project since November 1999 and has completed working drawings and specifications for a site start in December 2000. This will allow for completion by Christmas 2001 ready for the new school year

Onus on LanChile to prevent delays

DELAYS to LanChile flights to the Falklands are set to continue until the airlink with South America is registered with the Argentine Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MFA) as a scheduled flight as opposed to a charter flight.

At a public meeting last week Councillor Mike Summers explained that the onus is with LanChile to request a change to the status of the flight.

He also explained that there is a further problem in that if a flight is delayed on a Saturday the MFA in Argentina is not open on a Sunday to grant the flying permit. He said that it is important to try and

get flights on Sundays

Representations were made at the request of the Falkland Islands Government to the MFA by the British Embassy in Buenos Aires after delays occurred recently

Also at the meeting councillors said they had informed the Foreign Office in Britain that they were not in favour of suggestions emanating from Argentina that there should be a second stopover flight in Rio Gallegos Argentina en route to the Falklands.

They said, however, that there had been no official request for a second stopover in Rio Gallegos.

Waste oil dumped on Eliza Cove tip - illegal

AT Monday's public meeting. councillors confirmed that it was illegal to dump waste oil on the Eliza Cove rubbish tip.

They responded to a question from a member of the public who noted that he had seen 45 gallon drums of waste oil in that vicinity.

Councillor Summers said, "...it is certainly illegal. The Attorney General's first words in his response for us were that the dumping of waste oil at the Eliza Cove tip was a highly irresponsible act by the person or persons who did

The Attorney General also noted in his response there is a notice at the tip that waste oil should be taken to megabid where it is

The next public meeting will be held in January specifically to discus constitutional review issues including 'A Single Constituency and Single Transferable Votes' and 'Consensus versus ExCo'.

EOD mine clearance causes 7 hour fire

MINE clearance carried out by the Explosive Ordnance Disposal unit in the Sappers Hill area on Monday resulted in a fire inside a mine-

The fire took approximately seven hours to extinguish.

Four major fire appliances a 3000 gallon water bowser and 18 firefighters were present at the scene between 4pm and 11pm.

Around 28 mines exploded during the day.

Farmers to continue with Bradford?

ROBERT HALL of agency Falkland Wool Growers Ltd confirmed on Friday that all of those farmers who currently use the company's services to sell wool will continue to do so despite a proposal from the Rural Business Association (RBA) that Falklands wool might be sold directly over the internet.

Mr Hall recently paid a visit to the Islands and during an interview with Penguin News commented. The farms that normally market through Falklands Wool Growers have confirmed during my trip that they will continue to do so... the last thing that any market needs is uncertainty and the marketing system is going to continue in the same manner.

"Our farm principals have no intention of interrupting valued trade links. The two key elements of an agency such as Falkland Wool Growers are our principals on the one hand and our speciality customers on the other."

Mr Hall was responding to the RBA proposal that wool be stored, sampled and core tested in the Islands and sold over the internet via South America rather than via the traditional route of agents such as Falkland Wool Growers Ltd or merchants such as D.B. Holdsworth Ltd. based in Bradford

The initiative, said Mr Hall, is a fairly fluid proposal in that, "...bits seem to be being dropped," but the idea of marketing the Falklands clip in twenty tonne containers from Stanley was "ludicrous."

He commented, "It won't work because we lack a lot of facilities in Stanley and you need to get the wool to speciality users and premium markets and they don't necessarily buy 20 tonne containers.

"The wool needs to officially go to a hub such as Bradford, and Bradford is where Falklands Wool Growers customers are largely based.

"There is no point in adding costs and adding in time delays and there needs to be a demonstration of added value (from the proposal) which has yet to be demonstrated."

He said, "We need to see ideas that contribute to improved farm

profitability. Our principals have had a very tough time with a decade of falling wool prices. Adding costs or time delays would not work in their interests if that were to happen."

When asked why he believed this idea was being pushed. Mr Hall said. "Sometimes there is just a wish to do things differently. Developments within an industry should build on and develop systems that have been programmed to work and the system at the moment has been proven to work.

"If they want to trade on the internet the new Falklands portal could easily direct inquires to the current wool marketing people and maintain our core system which is so important to the Falklands."

Wool market situation

Mr Hall explained that in general the wool market situation is improving slightly. "The Australian market has gradually got better with the stockpile at 600,000 bales and sheep numbers around the southern hemisphere are dropping which is also constraining supplies. European fashion appears to be absorbing more wool."

He added. "The uncertainties surround the movement of currencies and there are huge amounts of value (around 25%) fied up for sterling wool producers in the value of sterling, in that the pound is very strong.

"In sheep producing countries like Australia and New Zealand where their respective dollar currencies are relatively weak it means that it is much cheaper than the rates three years ago to buy wool and were we to go back to those rates, wool prices would be much higher today."

New lease of life for Falklands carrier

THE Royal Navy aircraft carrier *HMS Invincible* which played a crucial part in winning the Falklands War has been given a new lease of life.

It has been announced in the British Parliament that the 16,000 tonne warship is to go into dock next year for a comprehensive refit and modernisation. This means that the ship which was due to be sold to Australiajust before the Argentine invasion will continue in service for another twelve years, thirty years longer than intended.

Her two sister ships Ark Royal and the Illustrious which replaced Invincible in the South Atlantic after the Argentine surrender, are also having refits, to maintain the Navy's air warfare capability un-

til all three light aircraft carriers are replaced by two larger carriers by 2012 at a cost of 2.7 billion pounds.

Invincible with the aircraft carrier Hermes, which was also to be sold prior to the Falklands, were the two vital vessels without which the Task Force could not have sailed nor the war won, without the air defence they provided against Argentina's strike aircraft.

The Task Force Commander, Sir John "Sandy" Woodward, declared that both vessels were "indispensable." He said that major damage to either could have led to abandonment of the whole Falklands operation. Argentina falsely claimed that both carriers had been sunk. HB/MP

Sites to be included are Steeple Jason, Carcass Island, Bleaker Island, New Island North Nature Reserve, New Island South Wildlife Reserve, Gypsy Cove, Kidney Cove, Stanley, Volunteer Point, West Point, Saunders Island, Sea Lion Island and two future sites, Port Howard and Weddell Island.

Interspersed with text will be photographs, sketches (to be generously donated by Mandy Shepherd) and maps. Jeremy Smith and I are designing maps for each site; there will be one map of the whole area and then a 'zoom' map highlighting specific areas frequented by cruise visitors. This will enable the guide to be used by any visitors to these areas.

Sven-Olaf Lindblad has kindly agreed to write the Foreword. His father Lars-Eric pioneered cruise tourism in the late 1960s bringing one of the first ships to the Falklands. This guide is to be dedicated to his memory.

Text is currently being drafted in conjunction with landowners and I would like to thank all involved for their continued support in this worthy project.

I would also like to thank the following people for their continued support; Jane Cameron, John Smith, Joan Spruce, Phil Stone, John Fowler, Robin Woods, Sulivan Shipping, Falkland Islands Company, Ann Brown and Nigel Hawks.

Wool marketing shift prompts questions

I UNDERSTAND that the newly formed Rural Business Association (RBA) came about because of decreasing Farmers Association members mumbers, and in an attempt to increase members, the scheme was opened to all rural residents in any kind of business, and this organisation is planning to hold a seminar which is exclusive to selected associations next month.

If that is correct, could the person who is deemed to be the authority in this newly formed group give answers/guarantees with regard to the questions below. In addition! would like to make comment on the other non-wool producing members: that is to say what qualifications do these people have when it comes to marketing wool? Questions

Are the RBA still actively seeking to set up a core sampling and lottting system in the Falkland Islands? If so, what are their reasons?

Who will be responsible for the likely escalated cost of core testing; and how much would such a plant cost the Falkland Islands?

Where will such a lotting and testing site be established and can the RBA guarantee the highest quality testing of wool bales?

Does the RBA plan to market quality Falkland wool in South America? If so, can they give a guarantee that prices will be considerably better than those currently received through our experienced agents and merchants in Bradford?

What happens to the wool should the RBA fail to achieve their desires? Will they expect the current agencies and merchants to step back in and bail them out?

Can the RBA guarantee to acquire sufficient amounts of wool from farmers for this project?

What guarantees can be given to selling the Falklandswool on the world wide web when we see total failure of that department down under?

What of the farmers who choose to continue with current proven

methods? Will the RBA guarantee to compensate them should their agent/merchant not be able to obtain sufficient quantities of wool to meet wool buyers' quotas?

What happens to the empty North Bound ships that would normally carry these bales of wool? Will the RBA guarantee that freight rates will not increase south bound because of this?

Who actually initiated this scheme?

How many farmers actually voted for such a scheme assuming that one person per farm voted?

How many of the non Association members were asked to vote on these issues?

These are some some of the issues that most concern farmers.

From my own observations if appears there is not the level of support that the RBA thinks on this issue, so it leads one to assume that someone in higher authority may well be responsible.

It is clear that if such a scheme were to be implemented it would cause devastation to farmers, or is this intended to be the case?

I also believe that the coming together of the FIDC/DoA/FLH will spell the end for many small farmers who will not be able to compete or even begin to match the potential of this outlit.

I feel that this is the thin edge of a very nasty plan to finally destroy small farming as we know it. Already considerable numbers of farmers are attempting to sell their farms. How many more to come when the RBA have finished the new playing field?

Burnerd surrenders "for the time being"

I REFER to last week's PN article concerning the fate of a privately built, owned and operated business for the past approximately 49 years

One angle which is very misleading concerns the rent. The land lease expired on the 30th September 1996. However, as it was the normal procedure, around mid-September of each year, I continued to pay the rent for the forthcoming year into the FI Government account with Standard Chartered Bank and, at the same time, informing the Financial Secretary by note, of the remittance made.

Following the payments of 1996, 1997 and 1998 I received a letter from the Crown Council informing me that my money had been returned as they were awaiting FIDC to confirm their intentions for the area. The payments of 1999 and 2000 were kept. Consequently it was not that I had not paid the rents, it was that FIG wouldn't accept my money for the land rent.

In early 1999 I received a letter from the Crown Council offering me a four month land rental contract. I was obliged to draw her attention to the fact that, on average, it took four months to replace stock.

Towards the end of that year. I received another offer, only this time it was for three months. Replying. I asked her to appeal to the Executive Council for their consideration in recognising the cost of maintenance and decorating. Apparently they did, and awarded me with a fortnight to accept their terms c. face eviction from our own store!

I refer to Councillor Cheek's remarks in that article-"when a lease ends, if it is not renewed..." Whose fault is that when FIG refuse to accept your money?

"A prime spot" - what does she refer to? I've managed this business for the past twelve years and I wouldn't call it any more 'prime' than any other shop in the town, irrespective of its position, and that is a proven fact.

A 22.65 times increase in rent is "very reasonable." Up to the present day, our rent has been £106 per annum for the ground which the store stands on, now they are requesting £2.400 a year to rent our own building.

She also refers to repainting of the building, whereas I am reliably advised that it is FIG's intention to replace the rusting iron with plastic coated metal, so eliminating the alternate year painting. Your readers, wherever they live will have formed their own opinions not only of the councillor's statement but of FIG's proposed actions.

To continue what our father built and operated for many years, it is all too apparent that I will have to surrender for the time being.

Finally I wish to personally thank the vast amount of people who have either telephoned or approached me acknowledging their disbelief at the workings of the councillors we elected.



Reindeer farming - unprofitable

SOME years ago, the councillors of the town of Liverpool were taken to Court and heavily fined for taking decisions that caused financial loss to the Treasury of the town they represented.

The following is an extract from The Economist, dated November

18, 2000.

Lapland. The indigenous Lapps, the Sammi people as anthropologists prefer to call them. rely on reindeer herding for most of their livelihood. Yet herding has become unprofitable, despite big state subsidies and the payment of compensation for animals lost to predators." When to this I am advised that Finland with hundreds of thousands of wild reindeer cannot find a market for reindeer meat (venison.) This has a very sharp and tangy taste. (On the last trip of RMS Darwin to South Georgia many quarters of reindeer were brought to friends here in Stanley. Most of these ended up where mine did. in the hen run.) Not pleasant cating at all.

I understand that Reindeer were landed in South Georgia over sixty or seventy years ago and have roamed in a wild state with no control of any kind in all these years. Constant inbreeding will be the norm, so one can not expect a quality animal nor more so a quality fleece and fibre. Not an investment that can be expected to make any

profit.

More than this, has anybody considered that removing these animals from the free and wild state in which they live, dumping them in the hold of a ship (I would not like to be the master of the ship and be responsible for the safe conduct of these wild animals to the Falklands) and bringing them into captivity could result in unwarranted cruelty to animals. Something that is not accepted in these Islands.

According to Penguin News, Council, with the vote against Councillor John Birmingham, has agreed to the installation of a herd of reindeer to be imported from South Georgia, and allocated £200.000 of tax payers money with this intent.

Where is it to be located? Tenders are requested for deer fencing

at Saladero.

When the Stud Flock was removed from Sea Lion Island the following statement was made by the Commission of Inquiry at that time. "The site must not only provide good lambing area but also must be large enough to allow all young stock to be kept on site until they are to brought for sale, also large enough to allow for expansion of the flock if necessary."

Saladero was picked as the new location. The late Mr Robin Lee, Manager of Landholdings at the time, was heard to say that he did not like losing this area of Darwin farm as it was one of the best. He also commented that constant use

of this area, reseeding and improvement of grass should be undertaken. But we now find that the Beef Herd which also needs extra pasture is also allocated to Saladero and intensive rotavating for the planting of grasses etc is in progress.

The story does not stop there. Deer fencing at Saladero gives one the impression that the reindeer herd is also to be allocated there. If this was the case of lodging three families, things would be easybuild a three storey house and allocated one on each floor and let them have a communal garden at the front. But here we are talking about land availability, pasture availability and, in the case of reindeer (wild.) a different way of rodeo gathering.

The general consensus is that reindeer are a non-starter. If Council want to start a deer farm I would suggest that they put the reindeer on hold and (considering that on Stats Island Mr Poncet already has a guanaco herd established) Mr Poncet be offered a chance to visit the guanaco farms in Chilean Tierra del Fuego, expenses paid (up to £3.000) and if the result of his trip was positive, finance the investment on a firm basis. If this idea is accepted, arrangements for visiting Chilean guanaco farms can easily be made by Government House to the British Consul in Punta Are-

The question is as follows.

In view of the fact that on taking oath they promised to wisely administer the values entrusted to their care for the benefit of the Colony.

Do the Councillors who voted favourably for the allocation of £200,000 - for the establishment of a reindeer herd which is considered by many as a non-starter and a sheer waste of Government monies, accept full responsibility for part or all of this value if issued and reimbursed said values if the investment proves to fail - the investment which is clearly for the setting up of a herd not as a zoo but rather as a profit making farm. This responsibility to be still carried by the voters concerned, even if at the time that the venue may fail, these voters may not by then be in Council.

The above is a question to Councillors. The second question is to the legal department.

Can Councillors be prosecuted if values entrusted to their care be unwisely administered?

PS Further to this I am assured that it is to be expected that these reindeer, bred in a wild sterile location with, therefore, no immunity to any disease or adverse bacteria they may encounter in local paddocks, can be expected to have a very short lifespan once they are landed in these Islands.

Nova Seafish Ltd. A bright future

NOVA SEAFISH LTD, a recently formed joint venture company whose shareholders include Seafish (Falklands) Ltd, have been awarded a Type 'C' Loligo licence for the vessel Saint Denis.

As reported in *Penguin News* a few weeks ago, it is the company's intention to rename the vessel the *Robin M Lee*, and place the vessel onto the Falklands Register.

Rodney Lee. Chairman of Nova Seafish Ltd commented, "We are extremely pleased with this result and are now very busy completing purchase of the vessel and making all the necessary preparations for commencement of fishing on February 1."

Pescanova SA are the Spanish partners in the venture, and Alfonso Paz-Andrade, Managing Director of Pescanova S.A. and a Director of Nova Seafish commented that. "Pescanovahave business interests in over 40 countries, and in every country we operate in partnership with the people from that country.

"This has always been our business philosophy: It has been profitable for Pescanova and profitable for the partners we work with. I see a bright future for Nova Seafish because it is a peoples' company, and I think it is important that in a rapidly developing economy such as in the Falklands that the people have the opportunity to share in the wealth of the country."

"I am very proud that Pescanova has been given the opportunity to be a part of this."

portunity to be a part of this."
According to Seafish General Manager. Hamish Wylie. Pescanova S.A. is the only publicly owned fishing company in Spain and quoted on the Madrid stock exchange. The group operate over 130 vessels world-wide and are major players in the Spanish frozen fish market. Seaview Ltd. the third shareholder in the company, currently operate two Loligo trawlers.

Mr Wylie said, "Seafish (Falklands) Ltd is a public company with its shares changing hands on a fairly regular basis. Shareholders who currently number 165 Falkland Islands residents, will shortly be given the option to purchase additional shares in the company, or pass the offer on to a friend."

Fle continued. "It is the policy of Seafish to enable any qualifying person to become a shareholder Seafish is the only opportunity, other than starting your own fishing company, for residents to invest in the heart of the Falklands economy which is fishing.

The Company hopes that through the distribution of additional shares to shareholders and a further rights issue, they will encourage an increase in the trading of shares in the Islands and thereby increase the opportunity for others to invest.

"Unfortunately," said Mr Wylie. "the cost and complexity of having an open share issue, to enable non shareholders to directly purchase shares in the company have restricted us to the rights issue route. Seafish shares have more or less doubled in value over each of the last two years and our participation in Nova Seafish can only improve the return on investment to shareholders, it certainly beats locking it up in a bank, any bank."

In addition to the recently awarded Loligo licence, Seafish have interests in live other trawlers, three of which hold long-term finfish licences, and representover 40% of the Far Eastern vessels in the Illex fishery including Japan.

MASSIVE FINANCIAL AID FOR ARGENTINA

THE International Monetary Fund announced this week that Argentina will receive an aid package worth 39.7 billion US dollars, in an effort to rescue its economy from a two long years of recession and unemployment.

The IMF finally agreed to release the funds after the Argentine Congress passed a much debated budget that included a series of severe austerity measures, following a political understanding between the ruling coalition of President De la Rúa and the Peronist opposition.

The Argentine government and international institutions expect the almost 40 billion will help restore confidence in the Argentine economy and among foreign investors who feared a default that could rapidly have extended to all emerging markets.

The aid package is sufficient to cover Argentina's foreign commitments for 2001 estimated in 20 billion US dollars and should help to boost the economy.

THINNING OF THE ICE SHEET

THE West Antarcticice sheet, closely watched as an indicator of the impact of global warming, may be threatened by a different phenomena — a slowing of the "ice streams" which nourish the massive shelf, according to a meeting of scientists from the American Geophysical Union in San Francisco.

Slawek Tulaczyk, an assistant professor of Earth Sciences at the University of California, said the new model proposed that the ice streams—fast, river-like flows which move ice out into ice shelves floating on the sea—were slowing and in some cases stopping altogether.

"In the most extreme case, some models suggest that these changes could result in a shift from the current interglacial climate to another

glacial period,"Tulaczyk said.

"I don't want to go that far, because we're still learning how the ice sheet would respond to changes in the ice streams; but it's an interesting possibility, especially since people have focused for so long on the possible collapse of the West Antarcticice sheet due to global warming."

The West Antarctic ice sheet, much of it contained in the sea-borne shelves, contains enough ice to raise global sea levels by 2/3 meters, and has been melting since the end of the last ice age.

However huge icebergs have recently been breaking off the shelves, prompting widespread concern that global warming has boosted the flow of the ice streams and accelerated the melting process.

Tulaczyk said, however, that his investigation of the flow behavior of the Antarctic ice streams indicated that the thinning of the broader ice sheet may be a natural process that is strangling the flow of ice to the ice shelves.

GALICIAN FLEET FACES BLEAK FUTURE

EUROPE'S decision to drastically cut hake quota for the fishing grounds of Gran Sol and the Gulf of Biscay could mean economic losses amounting to over 60 million US dollars for the Galician fleet, according to fisheries sources in Vigo.

The quota assigned to Spain for that zone is 9,333 tonnes. A total of 200 Spanish vessels operate in the area, of which 125 (62 per cent), belong to Galician companies, writes La Voz de Galicia.

Brussels also decided substantial cuts in the TACs of megrim, cod and sole.

In keeping with the latest scientific reports, which recommended a reduction in hake catches in Gran Sol and the Gulf of Biscay to conserve critical stocks, the European Commission originally proposed a reduction in the

TAC of 74 per cent to the Council of Ministers.

The European Commissioner Franz Fischler anticipated that important quota reductions would be applied, as well as measures to protect young fish and fingerlings, in order to prevent hake stocks from collapsing.

If the Commission's proposal are implemented. the consequences for the Galician fleet would be devastating. It is estimated that the 125 Galician-registered vessels would lose an estimated 60 million US dollars, whereas other vessels partly owned by Galician companies (16 UKflagged and 20 Frenchflagged vessels), which are strongly dependent on hake catches, are also likely to be badly affected.

Galician Ship Owners Association president Jesús Etchevers said that the fleet is willing to accept some measures, such as fishing bans, "but not such drastic cuts."

In a document addressed to the Spanish Ministry of Agriculture Galician Ship Owners proposed alternative measures to help recover hake stocks.

"We support the implementation of space-temporal fishing bans that prohibit all fishing activities whenever there are large amounts of juveniles", adding that an increase in the minimum size, by several centimetres, to preserve reproductively mature specimens, should also be included.



THE ENGLISH COMMUNITY INARGENTINA

"THE FORGOTTENCOLONY" was first published in London in English. but now has a Spanish version and is quite a success in Buenos Aires bookshops, according to the Argentine press

The book was written by a well known Anglo-Argentine journalist and researcher, Andrew Graham Yooll, who has lived both in London and Buenos Aires. During the last military regime he was forced to leave Argentina because of the constant death threats he received as Editor of the Buenos Aires Herald

According to the book the English speaking communities in Argentina were closely linked to the railways industry, but once they were nationalised, under Perón. "it was more than the end of a chapter, it was an epilogue, a disaster..."

Graham Yool also points out that

members of the English community in Argentina refused to be categorised as "immigrants" since this meant a descent in the social consideration and class system.

The book according to Argentine press reviews is not absent of controversy, since it also includes the British invasion of the early XIX century when the English taking advantage of the fact Spain was under Napoleon's rule tried to take over the River Plate, actually occupying Montevideo for over a year, from where attacks on Buenos Aires were organised.

The Falklands have also been controversial for the English speaking community in Argentina. and Graham Yool's own school experience in Buenos Aires sums up the issue: when asked on what side he would be if there was ever a war over the Falklands/Malvinas, in the book he writes: "Anglo-Argentines prayed for an honourable solution to the dispute, something like an earthquake or a giant sea wave in the South

FARM LAND PRICES IN CHILE FOREIGNERS are interested in the big farms, while the average Chilean farmer in Magallanes and Tierra del Fuego is condemned to either expand or cut losses and sell at whatever price

he can manage.
"A 3000/3500 sheep farm is no longer sustainable, and farmers either sell or risk expansion," said Colin Morrison from one of Punta Arena's main real estate companies.

As far as prices are concerned in Tierra del Fuego they range from 16 US dollars to 60 US dollars the hectare, but in the continent they can jump to 80/100 US dollars and even 200 dollars in the Mina Rica area.

The size of the farms varies from 3,500 to 4,000 hectares in the mainland, that is Magallanes Region, (including Isla Riesco. Rio Verde, close to the Argentine border. San Gregorio and the Torres del Paine area), up to an average of 90,000 hectares in Tierra del Fuego, (Bahia San Felipe. Cerro Sombrero. Cameron and Porvenir).

However Colin Morrison and Carlos García another real estate broker point out that these prices even if accessible for foreigners, are beyond the reach of many local farmers that are rapidly running out of business. Now you can't make a living with a

5,000 sheep farm, even for a single family, and, many farmers simply don't have the resources to expand if they wanted to continue farming. indicated Mr. Carlos Garcia

"We're going to a similar process to what happened in Argentine Patagonia where there are literally hundreds of abandoned farms and ghost establishments; it's very sad since this area was built and prospered on farming," added Mr. Garcia. Foreigners on the other hand are not interested in farming, they purchase land thinking in the wildlife, in conservation and one of the few areas left in the world relatively free of

URUGUAY AND ARGENTINA AGREE QUOTAS

THE Joint Uruguayan-Argentine Technical Commission of the Maritime Front in the River Plate has set the TAC (Total Allowable Catch) of scallop (Zygochlamys patagonica) and hake (Merluccius hubbsi) for

Scallop TAC was set at 17,535 tonnes (shells included) Based on the average biomass of the resource supplied by each of the parties. 80 per cent of the TAC (14,028 tonnes) has been allocated to Argentina and the remaining 20 per cent (3.507 tonnes), to Uruguay

All fishing vessels must carry observers on board to comply with the agreement and ship owners will have to cover the costs. Fishing areas will be closed as soon as TAC are used up.

Annual hake TAC for 2001 in the Argentina-Uruguay Common Fishing Zone, was set at 90,000 tonnes, of which 55,000 tonnes for Argentina and 35,000 for Uruguay

The Commission set aside an additional 10,000-tonne quota, that will depend on the results of future scientific surveys.

Maximum/overall length of the fishing vessels authorised to operate in the Common Fisheries Zone has also been modified and the use of bottom trawl nets will be forbidden for all types of vessels more than 28 metres long.

"ALMIRANTE IRIZAR" SAILS SOUTH

ARGENTINE icebreaker "Almirante Irizar" is preparing in Buenos Aires for its twenty first Antarctic season and is scheduled to leave with 400 people and tons of supplies next January 2nd

On its return trip in three months time the vessel will bring hundreds of tons of debris and rubbish accumulated in Argentine bases complying

with Antarctic Treaty regulations.
Of the 400 people on board, including three ladies, 150 are crew members and the rest scientists, some of them foreigners in exchange programs, that will be distributed among

the six Argentine stations.
The 15.000 tons Finnish built vessel is the backbone of Argentine scientific Antarctic exploration and has proven its sailing and ice worthiness on several occasions in the last 21 years of navigation in the South Pole. The vessel also carries two helicopters

Argentina has been involved in the Antarctic since 1903 when the corvette "Uruguay" rescued the expedition of Swedish explorer Otter Nordenskjold.

'Almirante Irizar" under the com mand of Captain Daniel Della Rodolfa, a veteran of Antarctic campaigns, is the only Latinamerican icebreaker and can sail in areas with a meter thick ice sheet, and can stand extreme conditions of up to six meters.



Children's Nature Calendar - November

by Megan Eggeling

'SUMER is icumen in - November is the time to sing that fine song. (Funny spellings because it was written in the 13th century!) But summer did not come in. Instead there was rain and hail and snowflakes.

Whatever the weather, however, November is the time of goslings and ducklings: time for the speckled Black-throated Finch chicks to scuttle into tall grasses, time for the bright red-chested Meadowlarks to feed their hungry young; time for the Pied Oystercatcher chicks to sprint on long legs across sandy beaches; time for perky Cobh's Wrens to flit from stone to stone on cat-free, rat-free shores and slip, like mice, down between the rocks just as your cam-

It was time, too, for the Blackcrowned Night Herons and the Rock Shags to take up residence in their 'apartment blocks' by Gypsy Cove. On the one side of the street', all neat and silent, the Vight Herons sat on pale-blue eggs in carefully made nests of twigs, well-bedded in the Tussac Grass.

On the other side, the glossy purple/black Rock Cormorants pushed and shoved on shaggy, seaweedy nests on tiny unsafe-looking ledges and 'kaarked' most unmusically.

Just there, too, a Dark-faced Ground-tyrant (Messenger Bird) I've heard it called - however did it get that name?) flew, with stuffed beak, to its nest well inside the tun-



nel of rock

Despite the unsummery weather, in came the summer visitors. Early in the month I watched a flock of White-rumped Sandpipers fly in and settle at Surf Bay amongst their chums, the Twobanded Plover which stay here all year round.

If you had wandered along Bertha's Beach, too, you would have seen lots of them pecking nervously about on the sands. They are easilv frightened and fly off very swiftly with a thin squeaky cry when disturbed. The Two-banded Plover are fairly tame, however, and one posed nicely for me on her nest of three green eggs, blotched with brown.

Another summer incomer was

the South American Tern You usually hear their high-pitched shrieking before you see them.

This 'swallow of the sea', almost all white with a black cap, is beautiful in flight. It's also very bad-tempered! Then there was the Falkland Skua (Sea Hen), that large dark brown pirate which can be very dangerous at nesting-time.

Best to avoid walking through its breeding colony! I watched one crash-diving onto a Rock Cormorant which had just surfaced with a beak full of food. It missed. The skua seemed to be getting very cross. It obviously wasn't as good a pirate as it thought it was. It flew up high over the water for an aerial view of its victim and crash-dived again but missed. Good, I said.

Two Ashv-headed Geese were seen at Brenton Loch early in the month - a rare sighting. This goose, with a grey head and neck is sometimes seen with Ruddy-headed and Upland Geese, so keep a look-out. Did you see any Black-necked Swans during the month? On a large pond along the Mare Harbour Road there were two pairs with three young ones - a lovely sight.

My bird of the month, however, was the White-tufted Grebe. It popped up all over the place on the Murrell, on the Fitzroy River, on the pond at Surf Bay. Unlike the two Chiloe Wigeon there, this little white-cheeked bird seemed to quite like my company and came up fairly close for me to photograph it.

Earlier in the month I saw two smaller Silvery Grebe which, like ballet dancers in silvery-white tutus, very prettily pirouetted on the Little Pond on Sea Lion Island...

Plantwise, it was the turn of the lovely flowers of Scurvy Grass to fall like rivulets between rocks and cascade over banks, painting the land with pink and white.

The tiny white flowers of the Wild Strawberry hid around stoneruns while the deep pink flowers of Thrift coloured the sea-shores. Right at the end of the month appeared clumps of the bright yellow daisy-like Woolly Falkland Ragwort. In the very last week of November I saw my first Vanilla

Smoking – some tips on how to stop

THE festive season of good cheer is upon us! New Year is the time for resolutions – how about giving up smoking?

If you have really decided that you want to give up smoking you are half way there. The more determined you are to give up the more likely you are to succeed. If you have tried to give up before and failed, do not despair; people who keep trying often eventually do succeed.

Stopping smoking is not easy. Nicotine is a very addictive drug. Withdrawal can be unpleasant producing both physical and psychological symptoms including headache, nausea and irritability. These symptoms can last for several weeks, but do persevere as the severity of the symptoms does gradually subside. Most people feel a lot healthier within a few weeks of giving up smoking.

Here are some tips that may help you with quitting smoking: • Write a list of reasons for giving

- up and carry it with you. Read the listevery time you feel like a smoke.

 Set a definite date for stopping and stop completely. Research shows that stopping gradually is less likely to succeed and people tend to cheat by inhaling more deeply and smoking the cigarette right to the end, thus defeating the
- whole object of cutting down.

 Tell everyone you are giving up smoking. Usually family and friends are very supportive.
- Get rid of ashtrays, lighters, matches and all your cigarettes. If your partner smokes, it is much easier if you give up together.
- Be aware of the situations in which you are most likely to smoke and try and avoid them if possible or develop a strategy to deal with it, such as chewing gum.
- Take one day at a time and mark it off on a calendar. Look at the calendar when you are tempted to have a fag. Tell yourself you don't



want to start smoking again after all the effort you have put in

- •Be positive. Tell people that you no longer smoke. You will have more money to spend on other things. Save it up for a treat. After a few weeks you will feel better, your sense of smell and taste will improve and you will cough less.
- Many people worry about putting on weight when they give up smoking. The average weight gain is 4lbs. This is much less harmful than smoking. Try sugar & fat free things to eat and use sugar free chewing gum.
- Don't despair if you have one cigarette. You do not have to start smoking again. Pick yourself up and try again. Look at the reasons why you had one and see if there is anything can be done to avoid that in the future.
- Nicotine substitutes help some people. These come in a variety of forms chewing gum, sprays and patches. Using one of these roughly doubles the success rate of giving up. These can be purchased from the hospital and generally cost less than what you spend on cigarettes.
- •Acupuncture is effective for some people. Dr Paver holds clinics and if you are interested you can make an appointment.
- •Some people find hypnosis helpful but this is not available locally. All of theses methods nicotine substitutes, acupuncture and hypnosis help to reduce the craving but are not a substitute for will power.

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
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Golfers look forward to festivities
