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Women's rights eroded?

DESPITE the very low take-up of government funded flights to the UK for termination of pregnancies, the Health Service has decided it will no longer fund the flights, in order to 'live within its budget'.

Patients already pay for the termination itself

A group of senior government officials have expressed their disgust at this decision that they feel is an 'erosion' of women's rights.

In the Falklands, only about two women per year (sometimes less) require a termination of pregnancy, confirmed Director of Health and Social Services Norman McGregor Edwards this week.

However, the Health Service will no longer be funding the flight to the UK from this week onwards, despite the fact that the department will only make a saving of approximately £2000 per year.

Only recently the Health Service spent £2,079.28 on a single advert for a dental post.

This year the Falkland Islands Government will go on to spend

•£600,000 on the abattoir, •£100,000 on light vehicles.

€£340,000 on plant.

Mr McGregor Edwards suggests patients pay for the flight out of their holiday credits.


He also added that the decision it is not based on a point of principle.

However, his colleagues on the Health Committee, Councillors John Birmingham and Jan Cheek appeared to contradict that claim by indicating they have based their support of the decision on the judgement that there is "...a growing casualness towards terminations."

Councillor Jan Cheek feels that withdrawing the payment of the flight might work as a contraceptive: "Perhaps this will focus some people's minds a bit more," she said

In practical terms, from Monday onwards, women who require terminations must raise the £1000 for the flight themselves. The termination will cost them approximately £500.

With living expenses added to



that, a woman, travelling on her own to the UK for a termination, will have to raise almost £2000.

Disgust

Asked for her feelings on the matter. Director of Mineral Resources Phyllis Rendell said, "Women's rights are being eroded here.

"Deciding on terminating a pregnancy is an emotionally scarring experience for any woman and the additional strain of funding the cost of an air fare is quite abhorrent."

Two other senior officials felt obliged not to be quoted on the record, but one commented anonymously, "These women already have to make a difficult decision and then travel alone to the UK where it is unlikely they will have any support from family. It is bad enough that the termination is not funded without adding this to it.

"This is a terrible step backwards for women's rights, and this blunder could be detrimental to the Islands' image in the wider world."

Special situations still remain where the health service will continue to pay for flights for terminations, such as conception due to rape, or where serious health risks exist to mother or baby, and in cases of deformities.

Mr McGregor Edwards said, "We've never paid for terminations except on grounds of acute medical need - those will continue and flights for those will continue."

But he is adamant that flights for those not deemed clinical cases are not a priority.

Councillor Cheek, when asked if she was concerned that the decision could lead to unwanted pregnancies replied, "People are using terminations as contraception."

She added, "There is a growing casualness towards terminations that I personally find worrying. When people are having multiple terminations the message is not getting through."

Your opinion

Penguin News asked a number of Islanders and residents how they felt about the decision.

● Islander Zoe Luxton said, "Making the decision to terminate a pregnancy is quite probably the most difficult decision any woman (plus or minus a partner) will have to make.

"The arguments for and against termination are endless with many people having strong beliefs one way or another, which others must respect whether they agree or not. My own personal view is one in favour of termination, given the vast numbers of unwanted and abused children and struggling, usually young, single parents.

"But regardless of your agreement or disagreement with me the fact remains that the decision to have a termination is emotionally and physically exhausting and the Government should be supporting any person faced with this gruelling decision rather than putting another (extremely large) hurdle in the way, that is, the vast amount of money needed for flights, treatment and lodeines.

lodgings.
"This is an amount that most people do not easily have to hand even with holiday credits, thus this Government decision is paramount to preventing women having even the choice of a termination, which quite frankly in a modern society as ours is appalling."

Bruce Wilks commented.
 "This is a terrible violation of women's rights."

He feels that cases should be treated individually, adding, "But I hope the requirement to pay for flights (and lets face it, most people would want to be accompanied on such a trip) won't make somebody decide to go ahead with a birth that they otherwise would have had terminated if they could afford the flights.

"Obviously that might also work out for the better in the long run for some cases but that is not for FIG to judge on in advance."

- Former councillor Sharon Halford believes that if a doctor is satisfied that his patient needs a pregnancy termination then that avenue should be available under the free medical service.
- Stanley resident Emma Edwards said, "I find this outrageous." She believes terminations should be considered on an individual basis

She qualified this saying, "People using abortion as a form of contraception should be made to pay for their treatment as it is not something that should be treated casually..."

● James Marsh commented, "The mere fact that no contraceptive, besides sterilization, is 100% successful proves that the view that only 'stupid girls' get pregnant by mistake is ridiculous, as is the notion that providing a free abortion service would encourage some to prefer the traumatic experience of an abortion (defined by Olivia Gans as "mechanical rape") rather than a condom in the first place."

UNFORTUNATELY even at the age of 33 I don't have £2000 tucked away for emergencies, but if it all goes horribly wrong I can get my hands on a bottle of gin and a coathanger.

So that's all right then..

For those who haven't heard yet from July 1 the health service no longer funds flights for terminations of pregnancies (apart from health

So by withdrawing what they refer to as a 'modest' charge, an individual with an unwanted pregnancy will now have to come up with £1000 for the flight (no sorry we don't have a clinic) £500 for the termination, plus the cost of travel and a cheap B&B at maybe £30 per night for perhaps two weeks.

I think that tots up near enough to a 'modest' £2000.

OK, perhaps I personally could come up with it at a real push, but could a sixteen year old? Could a thirteen year old?

What if her parents couldn't afford it? What if her 'partner', if he was still around, didn't have a job? What happens then?

Would FIG change their minds and help out if she crept to them 'humbled and shamed'?

Or would they tell her to get on with it? In which case the resulting child may be unwanted and even unloved.

But forgetting hypothetical situations, isn't it enough that women. and often very young girls, must experience the terror, fear and misery that accompanies an unwanted pregnancy, without their situation being made so much the worse, so much more complicated, and even humiliating, by FIG taking away this absolutely essential service.

I can only surmise that the people who made this decision have neither experienced this situation first hand themselves, nor supported a traumatised friend or relative through the heartbreaking and stressful de-

cision making process that an unwanted pregnancy brings.

I have heard the argument that "some people" are using termination

as birth control.

But please trust me when I say that the majority of women, if any, do not have wild, wanton sex with the thought in the back of their mind "It doesn't matter if I get pregnant I can always have an abortion."

Watch my lips - People Make Mistakes - and some presumably.

make more than one.

But that is not a good reason to patronise either those who have made mistakes, or, punish the rest of the women that unfortunately will go on to do so.

Mr McGregor Edwards told Penguin News that there was no principle involved in this decision. Perhaps he sincerely believes this to be true. But it is not.

He and the rest of the committee are withdrawing this service because (and both of the following reasons have been indicated to Penguin News by councillors).

1. They want to save money, and,

2. They feel people should act more responsibly in the first place. "...after all there's lots of birth control available..."

To translate that last one, they believe women should have used the pill, should have used the condom, or should have kept their legs closed. But because they didn't, they can damn well find their own way to a reputable clinic (8000 miles away).

Now slap me for saying so, but do I, or do I not, detect a few

principles there?

YES, a responsible and safe attitude to sex should be encouraged at every possible opportunity.

But please, please don't punish women when the message doesn't quite make it through.

Councillor Cheek suggests that by not providing a paid flight it might encourage people to be more responsible with birth control.

This is tantamount to saying easy availability of a flight to the UK for an abortion encourages irresponsible sex, which is no different from

saying that the availability of legal abortion itself encourages irresponsi-

Now I am sure there are a few people out there that believe legal abortion encourages irresponsible sex, but I strongly suspect none of our councillors would ever be tempted to claim it in a manifesto.

And after all, who really believes for even one mili-second that withdrawing this service will lead to a more responsible attitude and in turn a decrease in unwanted pregnancies?

No, it will simply mean that those girls who are already upset by their situation will now have to feel frightened and helpless too.

There are many reasons why people have to travel to the UK for health treatment and a proportion are self-inflicted, caused by drinking alcohol, overeating or injuries from sport.

I have no objection to the money I pay in tax being used to assist those people any more than I object to it assisting women to travel to the United Kingdom for terminations if that is their choice.

However if it is no longer to be used for the latter then I wish to

strongly object to it being used for any of the former.

Councillors, whether you acknowledge it or not, your decision accept this recommendation is bigoted and mercenary and most certainly wrong.

'Lucky' serviceman avoids prison

A YOUNG serviceman will be thanking his lucky stars after he narrowly avoided a prison sentence in court on Wednesday.

Phillip Alan Eldridge (22) of the Royal Navy pleaded guilty to a charge of driving at Mount Pleasant (MPA) with an alcohol level four times the legal limit.

Prosecutor Graham Cripps told the court that on June 21, three corporals based at MPA were travelling in a vehicle when they witnessed another vehicle being driven erratically. twice crossing over to the wrong side of the road and only narrowly avoiding collisions with approaching traf-

The corporals followed the vehicle for some time until it came to a sudden stop and the driver got out and ran away. The three gave chase. catching up with the driver. Mr Eldridge, in a corridor of the MPA complex.

They detained Mr Eldridge and noticing he smelled of alcohol, informed the military police who ar-When breathalysed at rested him. the Mount Pleasant police station. Mr Eldridge provided a sample with a lower reading of 141 micrograms of alcohol per 100 millititres of breath. The legal limit is 35 micrograms.

In court on Wednesday, Mr Eldridge's commanding officer, the Senior Naval Officer in the Falkland Islands, spoke on the defendant's behalf. He said he had met with Mr Eldridge who was, "...full of remorse," and deeply regretted his actions, adding that Mr Eldridge had a promising career in the Navy and was a potential officer candidate.

l·le said a custodial sentence would mean a likely dishonourable discharge from the military for the defendant and urged the Senior Magistrate to consider an alternative punishment He said the Navy did not wish to lose Mr Eldridge.

The defendant then read a statement saying he was "gutted" he had put not only his own safety but that of others in jeopardy. He added that the offence had been his first biggest mistake and he was determined, make it my last."

The Senior Magistrate, Nick Sanders, said he had been presented with a "dilemma," explaining that Mr Eldridge's high alcohol reading should mean an immediate custodial sentence. However he added he was 'wavering" and ordered an adjournment to allow for further enquiries "...a reasonable alternative."


The case readjourned on Wednesday afternoon. After hearing from probation officer Gordon Whiting, Mr Sanders told Mr Eldridge he was, 'very lucky." and had come very close to putting his career at risk.

He added that a prison sentenœ would be disproportionate to what had clearly been a one-off mistake and, taking into account Mr Eldridge's early guilty plea, he was convinced the correct nunishment should be an eighty hour community service order, to be served at Mount Pleasant

Mr Sanders also took the, "...ex-ceptional step," of fining Mr Eldridge £800 and ordered him to pay prosecution costs of £70.

Both Mr Cripps and Mr Eldridge's commanding officer commended the three corporals who apprehended the defendant for their actions.

BAS farewells Captain Lawrence

He was awarded the Polar Medal in 1983 and the MBE in 1998, and also has a Meteorological Office Award.

He took command of the newest BAS vessel, RRS Ernest Shackleton, in 1999, leaving her for the last time in April when he enjoyed a party with his Falklands friends in Stanley.

PN reports on Farmers Week

Councillors grilled in public meeting

FARMERS had the opportunity to put forward a number of questions to councillors at a public meeting

held on Wednesday morning.
Councillors John Birmingham. Jan Cheek, Richard Cockwell, Philip Miller and Roger Edwards attended the meeting

Amongst the topics raised, the abattoir was the most prominent, with questions on prevention of fire and the lack of adequate grazing ground around the abattoir.

After outlining the causes a fire at the abattoir in May, Councillor Cockwell assured the meeting that the necessary steps to avoid a similar incident in the future were being

The councillors were also quizzed

on whether they felt Sand Bay was still the correct location for the abattoir, to which councillor Birmingham replied that given the alternative locations he still felt that Sand Bay was the right option.

All councillors pointed out that the question now was not whether the location was right or not, but what can be done to make it work.

Tourism insurance Another strongly debated issue was tourism insurance for farms Many farmers referred to the fact that those running tourism related businesses found it extremely difficult, sometimes impossible, to find fair insurance cover while still keeping business profitable.

Councillor Birmingham com-

mented that Falkland Islands Tourism and the Attorney General's Chambers were currently working together to find a way to alleviate the strain on farmers.

Ferry? Answering a question on when the East/West ferry service would be in operation, Councillor Roger Edwards replied that a proposal for the building of a port at New Haven had not gone through the design stage yet, and that he could not see it being operational within the next three

Neither he nor Councillor Cockwell could say whether the service would be regularly scheduled, as that would depend on demand and the financial situation at the time.

PLUNA to fly to Falklands?

URUGUAY'S main airline PLUNA says it officially requested authorisation last week to fly to the Islands, however the Director of Civil Aviation in the Falklands. Andrew Newman, says he has recieved no

such request.
Mr Milton Rodríguez, president of the Uruguayan carrier, said that the Boeing 767 that flies several times a week to Spain has idle hours in between the regular schedule and, we would like to make commercial use of them.

However, Mr Rodriguez also cautioned that any request to the Uruguayan Civil Aviation authorities must follow consultation with the Foreign Affairs Ministry, and, "...the outcome is not certain.

"Uruguay's traditional position, as a small country, is that the country does not get involved in those conflicts where territorial claims are on the table," said Mr Rodriguez.

"We know that in the past there was a sea link to Falklands from Montevideo, but I believe that was probably the only link. The situation is different, as the Islands are now linked with Chile. Nevertheless that's the diplomats task, our interest is entirely commercial," said Mr Rodriguez.

"It'll be several weeks before we have any further news," concluded Mr Rodríguez. MP/PN

Pooling collective knowledge: a better future for Islands meat

OVER thirty members of the Islands' farming community together with staff from the Agriculture Department and Falkland Island Development Corporation (FIDC) attended a meeting about FIDC activities and the Falkland Islands Meat Company at the Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday.

The meeting began with a talk by Fiona Didlick explaining FIDC procedures and objectives.

The second half of the meeting, which concentrated on the Falkland Islands Meat Industry, was led by Connic Stevens, also of FIDC.

Farmers were given the chance to participate by putting forward any issues which they felt needed to be

Amongst the points raised were potential markets and marketing strategies for Falklands-produced meat and difficulties, both practical and financial, encountered by the abattoir during its first season

Both Mrs Stevens and a large number of farmers agreed on the importance of promoting the 'green' qualities of Falklands meat, especially characteristics such as the disease-free status that Falklands livestock enjoys

Abattoir Manager John Ferguson explained some of the operational problems that had affected the abattoir's performance in the first season, in particular waste disposal systems and the chiller capacities.

Mrs Stevens stressed that, abattoir was originally built for the benefit of the farming community and to make the project work, it is crucial that we have broad involve-

ment from farmers"
She added, "This genuine desire to move the meat industry forward by pooling our collective skills and knowledge is the best way for us to build a better future for the Meat Industry in general." Both Mrs Stevens and Mr Ferguson plan to visit farmers in the near future in order to discuss these issues further provide an opportunity to involve all those farmers who were unable to attend the meeting.

Tourism's key points: consistency, cleanliness and friendliness

Silver and bronze for Falklands

AFTER four days of competition at the tenth NatWest Island Games in Guernsey, the Falklands have won silver and two bronze medals.

Graham Didlick, who missed the 2001 Island Games on the Isle of Man, scored 290 in the Police Pistol 1 Individual event, to take second place and a silver medal. Four years ago at the 1999 Island Games in Gotland, he scored 289 but had to settle for fourth place.

Then on Thursday morning he snatched the bronze medal in the N.P.A. Service Pistol B Individual competition, to add to his earlier

After gaining the silver, Graham said, "I'm highly delighted to win a medal for the Falklands - my tenth in the Island Games - particularly as I had to borrow a pistol in order to participate at the Games. After coming close on several previous occasions in this particular discipline. I feel very happy at finally winning a medal.

Stringent laws which now aply to the owning of hand guns in Britain, meant the cost of conveying pistols from the Falklands to Guernsey through a recognized security company was prohibitive. Friendly shooters on the host island came to the rescue and supplied pistols for the Falklands team members

Andy Torode of Guernsey took the gold medal with a score of 296, while Derek Wilde from the Isle of Man was back in third place, winning bronze, with a score of

Graham Didlick now has a haul

of 11 medals, made up of one gold, four silvers, and six bronze.

In the Service Pistol B Andy Torode established a new Games record with a score of 115. Chris Parkin of Guernsey was awarded the silver as he scored more bull eyes than Graham Didlick, although both shooters scored

The Falklands shooter's achievement in winning silver and bronze medals is quite magnificent, as he beat competitors from the much larger populated islands of Jersey, Gotland. Isle of Man, Gibraltar and Rhodes.

The full-bore rifle team of Gareth Goodwin and Chris McCallum, won a surprise bronze medal for the Falklands in the Queens Prize Pairs competition. As expected Jersey and Guernsey contested the destination of the gold and silver medals, but the Falklands pairing were on top form and finished 36 points ahead of the more fancied, and much bigger, Isle of Wight.

Gareth Goodwin, fresh after breaking all of the Falklands National records at last year's Commonwealth Games, was in fine form once again. He scored a total of 287, made up of scores of 47, 48, 49 on the first day, and 72 and 71 on the second.

Chris McCallum, competing in his third Island Games, cracked home scores of 46, 49, 45, 66 and 73 for a total of 279. Their aggregate of 566 was good enough to comfortably take the bronze medal.

Jersey won the gold with their shooters Cliff Mallett and Peter Stock scoring a combined 589, while the host island, Guernsey, disappointed the home supporters, having to settle for the silver on 585

In the Individual Queens Prize com-

petition, Gareth Goodwin finished sixth with a score of 381. After a slightly disappointing run of lower than expected scores, his form improved dramatically at the final stages and he hit the maximum of 75, but it was too late to make any impression on the medal winners. Chris McCallum scored 377 to finish in seventh position.
Peter Stock of Jersey took the

gold with a score of 399, Peter Jory of Guernsey the silver with 397 and Phil Ogier of Jersey winning bronze on 390.

Badminton The Falklands Badminton players produced a highly satisfactory performance. Douglas Clark won both his singles matches in the team group stages against Gibraltar and the Orkney Islands, but on each occasion the Falklands went down 1-

The match against Bermuda proved to be an exciting affair, and was tied at 2-2, before the Bermudian mixed doubles pairing of Rick Dorusch and Amanda Smith edged out Doug Clark and Nikki Luxton to clinch the match 3-2. Earlier Trudi Clarke had beaten Anna Janczewska 11-2, 13-10, while Nikki Luxton and Lyn Brownlee teamed up to beat Amanda Smith and Tracy De Silva 15-12, 15-11 in the doubles.

In the mens singles open event, Doug Clark progressed to the second round. This is the first time that a Falklands badminton player has progressed beyond the first round. He beat Shetland's Graham Keith 15-7, 15-7, before going out to K Smulter of Aland 2-15, 6-15.

Glenn Ross, the Falklands lowest handicap player, soon established his skills on the La Grande Mare golf course. His 77 in the first round, which included 9 pars, bettered Leon Marsh's previous best of 82, by 5 strokes. In the second round Glenn lowered the record to 76, but battling Roy Smith recovered from a 'disastrous' 100 on the opening day to also score 76, with eleven pars, and become joint record holder. Kevin Clapp recorded scores of 88 and 83 while Chris Clarke was left in fiftieth place after rounds of 93 and 90.

Sharon Marsh, winner of a silver certificate two years ago during the Isle of Man games, carded scores of 98 and 96 over the first two rounds.

Swimming

Swimmers Donna Triggs and Kerri Ross both achieved personal bests in several of their events at the Beau Sejour Leisure Centre.

Donna knocked more than 2 seconds of her personal best in the 50m Freestyle, recording a time of 33.77. Kerri recorded a time of 50.23 in the 50m Breaststroke - her personal best being 53.44.

Track events

On the track two young Falklands athletes enjoyed their first experience of International competition. Kyle Biggs, who carried the flag for the Falklands at the Opening Ceremony broke the one minute barrier, recording a time of 59.44 in the 400m.

16 year old Roxanne Morrison,

who is more accustomed to winning the tough cross-country Mt. Tumbledown run, was timed at a very creditable 6 minutes and 3 seconds in the 1,500m. Photographs next week.

FIDF'S chest full of medals at Bisley

THE Falkland Islands Defence Force team has performed well at this year's Bisley shooting competitions collecting an array of top prizes, including a number of gold medals.

The fire team, consisting of Captain Derek Clarke, Lieutenant Andy Brownlee, Sergeant David Peck, Corporal Russell Smith, Corporal Ian Betts, Private Daniel Biggs, Private Stuart Doyle and FIDF Commanding Officer, Major Peter Biggs, have collected a number of top awards at the competitions which attract entries from members of the armed forces from a number of countries including the United Kingdom, Australia, Oman, Ireland, South Africa and the United States.

The FIDF team was unable to get range time to practice all the matches before competing began and therefore had a cautious start on the first day of the Army Rifle Association competition. They were expected to acclimatise quickly to the UK's summer temperatures, particularly as a number of the shoots involved fast runs.

According to team captain, Major Biggs, the FIDF team, maintained good shoots throughout the competition with several high and low points.

"One of the high points was the fire team performance in the combat snap shooting match. This match involves a timed rundown over obstacles and a timed shoot of targets at 300 metres.

"A fire team consisting of Lt Brownlee, Cpl Betts, Pte Doyle and Pte Biggs came second in the match, being beaten by only one point by the Omani team." They were presented with silver medals during the mass prizegiving at the end of the Army competition.

During this ceremony, attended by some of the most senior officers in the British military, Cpl Betts and Pte Biggs were also presented with gold and silver medals respectively for the Light Support Weapon match.

Major Biggs added that Captain Clarke achieved an overall score sufficient to place him with the Queen's medal 100 finalists, "...although he was not able to take part in the final because he was in the 'honours only' capacity of an overseas competitor.

The Territorial Army competition began on Friday, June 27, and Major Biggs said, "It was soon evident that the standard of marksmanship was equal to, or better in some cases, to the regular army.

On the first day of competition, an FIDF team consisting of Lt Brownlee, Cpl Betts, Pte Doyle and Pte Biggs achieved a bronze medal in the falling plate competition. Major Biggs added, "Another notable achievement was the first place win in the Cambridgeshire Cup pistol shoot by Pte Biggs. This match is open to new soldiers and Daniel won by a clear twenty points, however as an overseas competitor he was competing for honours only and the impressive trophy went to the person placed second. Pte Biggs was also placed fourth overall in the 'new soldier' rifle competition

The FIDF team had some excellent scores in the Territorial Army (TA) competition and no less than three members of the team, Cpt Clarke, Cpl Betts and Pte Biggs, made it through to the TA Queen's Medal 50 competition (again, honours only).

Major Biggs commented, "The TA competition was as hard, if not harder, than the regular army competition. Team members had to rise at 5.30am in order to meet the shooting schedule times and weapons were usually not returned to the armoury until 7.00 or 8.00pm."

During the TA prize ceremony, the FIDF team was presented with the silver medal in the Alexander Trophy competition, coming sec-ond to a team selected from the United Kingdom Territorial Army. South Africa took the bronze medal in this international event.

June weather summary

From the Mount Pleasant Meteorological Office

JUNE was a month of average temperatures, but duller and wetter than average with rainfall the third highest on record.

Temperature

The mean maximum temperature was 4.3C, exactly the average for the month. The highest recorded temperature was 9.2C on the 4th and the lowest maximum of 1.1C occurred on the 6th.

The mean minimum temperature for the month was 0.4C again average for the month.

The lowest minimum temperature of -3.0C was recorded on the 7th. Air frost occurred on 12 nights and ground frost on 19 nights.

Rainfall

Rainfall was well above average with 102.5mm against the average of 60.6mm. The maximum daily fall of 18.5mm occurred on the 5th.

There were 28 days with 0.1mm or more and 23 days with

1.0 or more.

Fog occurred on six days during the month.

Snow

Snow fell on twelve days, giving snow cover on seven days, mainly at the beginning of the month. Hail also occurred on four days.

Sunshine

Sunshine was less than average with 46.9 hours recorded against the norm of 59.1 hours. The maximum daily recorded sunshine was 7.0 hours on the 20th.

Wind/Gales

The mean wind speed for the month was 13.2 knots against the norm of 13.4 knots.

Gales (34 knots or more over a ten minute period) occurred on two days, the 7th and 22nd.

The highest gust recorded was 60 knots on the 7th. Gusts exceeding 33 knots occurred on 13 occasions, again average for the month.

Women's right removed

FIG have taken away a woman's right to choose.

Only recently I read in a magazine that women's access to reproductive health care, including abortion, were under threat around the world. I never dreamed this included the Falkland Islands. It seems that a woman's legal right to terminate a pregnancy in the Falklands does not guarantee that they will have access to it. By putting a ban on any public funding FIG are not protecting women of the Falklands. Instead by blocking access to abortion FIG are discriminating against women.

This restriction imposed by FIG unfairly jeopardizes the health and well-being of women and their families. It denies women access to safe legal, reproductive health care services. The result is that many women who seek abortions must wait while they raise funds, postponing their abortions until later in their pregnancies, when the costs and the risk of medical complications of these more complicated abortion procedures are higher. Women who do not have the ability to pay for abortion services are forced to carry an unwanted pregnancy to term or worse still may resort to self-inducing an abortion. This seriously risks women's health.

This shocking situation has been forced upon Falkland Island

women without any public consultation or debate. FIG claims they want to save money. Fundamental rights such as the woman's right to choose should be the last things to be cut on cost grounds. This comes from the same government that can justify the further spending of hundreds of thousands of pounds on an abattoir that will loose money every year at the expense of women's rights to reproductive health care.

Don't be fooled, senior health officials and councillors have made this decision based on their own anti-abortion beliefs. If councillors wish to debate ethics and use moral reasons to ration health care lets also discuss funding treatment for people who CHOOSE to smoke and then get cancer.

After all the health system pays for them to go to the UK for extensive cancer treatment. Or what about people who choose to eat unhealthy foods and become obese and do not exercise and then require treatment for preventable diabetes or heart disease? FIG are discriminating in the health services they provide and fund. Because this decision affects women disproportionately it is also anti-women.

Please allow women to continue to have access and the right to the quality reproductive health care that they deserve.

FI Holdings publishes year end report

FALKLAND ISLANDS Holdings (FIH), a UK listed company operating in the Falkland Islands had a challenging but satisfactory year, according to its Chairman. David Hudd

Falkland Islands Holdings is parent company of Falkland Islands Company Ltd. Looking back on 2002, Mr Hudd commented. "Overall last year the Group performed satisfactorily. The recent upturn in fishing has improved confidence in the Islands which will have a beneficial impact on operations this year.

"We continue to expand our businesses within the islands and a farm-in partner is being sought for the onshore minerals interest.

With a stable Falkland Islands business and the financial flexibility for corporate activity, the Group is well set for future organic and acquisitive growth.

In his end of year statement, Mr Hudd commented on the company's performance in 2002. He said the company's retailing division experienced difficult trading conditions. "Last year's poor fishing season generate lower consumer confidence within the Islands leading to reduced levels of public and private capital expenditure

'As a result, sales and profits from the Homecare and Building Supplies operation declined sharply, although the other retailing areas maintained their profitability."

He continued, "For the Fishing Agency, the poor finish to the 2002 fishing season adversely affected the first half but a good start to the 2003 season enabled the agency to increase profit over 2002.

Oil and Gas

Mr Hudd said, "The Falkland Islands Hydrocarbon Consortium, in which the Group holds a 20% interest, has been evaluating the licensed area with a view to identifying promising structures. The first stage of this work has included the acquisition of seismic data and its reprocessing is currently in progress.

We anticipate that our share of total expenditure for the current financial year will amount to approximately £45,000 which is being capitalised under the successful efforts method.

Minerals

Exploration continued in the year on the Onshore Prospecting licence covering the Falkland Islands in which we will have earned a one third interest later this year.

"Particle gold has been recovered from a number of locations in the Falklands and the field work carried out included the collection of samples from one of the prospective areas. The subsequent analysis of the samples did not confirm the existence of commercially attractive grades."

He continued, "However the Joint Venture has identified several other prospects that require additional work. With our partners, Cambridge Mineral Resources plc and Global Petroleum Ltd, we are considering our options to undertake this work including introduc-ing a new partner."

Concluding his report, Mr Hudd said, "We continue to seek to improve the quality of our businesses within the Islands. The major extension to the West Store, our principal retail outlet, is on schedule and should be completed by the end of July.

"We are also currently discussing important changes to our insurance agency arrangements which, if concluded, would enhance the level of service and expand the range of products we are able to offer to our clients.

Mr Hudd addressed the impact of the Falkland Islands Government Fisheries Policy Review upon

He said, "Current proposals for the alteration of the fisheries licensing legislation should be in place for the next financial year, and this development will enable the Islands economy to receive a larger share of the proceeds of fishing.

Stamp issue marks princely birthday



PRINCE WILLIAM'S twentyfirst birthday has been celebrated in the Falklands and other Overseas Territories with the release of commemorative postage stamps.

He is the first member of the Royal Family to have his 21st birthday marked in this way.

According to The Times newspaper, the collection of tribute stamps has been co-ordinated by the Crown Agents Stamp Bureau which acts on behalf of twelve of the United Kingdom Overseas Territories.

According to The Times, "Each postal administration has issued a pair of stamps with the designs setenant, joined together side by side, in a souvenir sheetlet of ten with a decorative border on the left hand side depicting images of the young Prince of Wales."

The two Falklands stamps feature Prince William at Eton College on June 16, 2000 and playing polo with Prince Harry Cirencester on July 15, 2001.

HOW much money has been spent on the Department of Agriculture's Pasture Improvement Scheme?

How many farms have participated and how many hectares have been cultivated under the programme?

Our thanks to the Director of Agriculture, Peter Johnston, for the following response.

In the five years 1998/99 to 2002/03 the pasture improvement scheme has spent approximately £1,388,000 of the £1,710,000 allocated for this period.

The scheme was planned to run for 10 years and has reached the half way mark this June.

There are 49 farms working on pasture improvement (26 on East Falkland and 23 on West Falkland).

A total of 1730 ha has been developed to a mixture of permanent improved pasture, semi-improved pasture and forage crops (860 ha on East Falkland and 870 ha on West Falkland)

The initial proposal for the scheme recommended a review af-

ter 5 years.

The Department of Agriculture has initiated this review to determine whether the scheme is providing a worthwhile return on the investment by Government and

The Department is seeking input from farmers for this review and a session at Farmers Week on Thursday July 3 is part of the reFOR some time it appears that a farmer has been receiving reduced price fuel from the military.

Is this true and if so, will reduced price fuel be offered to other farmers?

A spokesperson from Headquarters British Forces commented, "HQBFFI does not sell fuel to any farmer on a regular basis and has no plans to do so in the future

THE Stanley Christmas races are in jeopardy.

Last year Stanley races were cancelled due to bad weather, a situation that left the local population berest of an important and fun tradition that began in 1907

Although this lack of things to do on Boxing Day was a most unusual situation it may become the norm from 2006 onwards.

Apart from the land directly in the vicinity of the grandstand the remainder of the race course is owned by the Falkland Islands Company, and they have confirmed to the Stanley Sports Association that on February 6, 2006 they intend to reclaim that land for the construction of houses.

Stanley Sports Association Chairman, Steve Vincent, who was re-elected at Tuesday nights SSA Annual General Meeting told Penguin News, "FIC Ltd. have made it clear that they require the land for building purposes, and have left the association no choice but to find another suitable racecourse within the Stanley area.

"Unfortunately the sites considered so far are not suitable or require heavy financial investment. Perhaps convincing the FIC that destroying the existing site will have a detrimental effect on the



town is the answer.

"Most people enjoy the sports at Christmas, along with the mini sports and fun days held during the year, and considering the outcry when the event was postponed last Christmas, the sports popularity is not declining

"I am hoping for considerable support for the Stanley Sports Association from within the community, mainly from volunteers willing to help on the committee and at the races, but also from concerned citizens who are unwilling to see another Stanley facility disappear in the name of development.

"This race track is part of the heritage of Stanley, and should be allowed to continue as such. The Association is holding an Extraordinary General Meeting at 5pm on the July 31 in the Chamber of Commerce function room to discuss matters further, and I would encourage old and new Stanley Sports supporters to attend."

Other business

Also discussed at the meeting was the work undertaken on the course in an attempt to prevent cancellation due to wet weather. Mr Vincent explained that ditches had been dug and tested and ap-

peared to be working efficiently. Pipes will be laid in the ditches which will assist rain water to run off the course.

Jockey Tim Bonner noted however, that should there be rain on the day of the races themselves even the new ditches would not prevent the course from becoming extremely soft.

The 'pulling up' area had also been improved to cover dangerous rocks that had appeared as a result of erosion. However recent heavy downpours mean further work will be need before next Christmas.

With regard to finances the Treasurer confirmed that despite there being no Christmas race meeting the SSA had "...not suffered too badly." It was agreed to increase the price of a 'grog' ticket in the Jockey bar to £1.

In the Chairman's report Mr Vincent said it was unfortunate that although the decision not to have the races at Christmas had been decided by the jockeys, the SSA committee had received a great deal of abuse from the general popula-

He pointed out that the committee was made up of unpaid volunteers but, "...the minute a person joins the committee they seem become a target for abuse.

Overall. Mr Jarvis is satisfied 1 with his accomplishments in the

Islands, and believes he has achieved.

In particular however, he takes special pride in the fact that, "...Government House has more credibility than it has done in the past, that we are seen to be as transparent as we can be with FIG and the councillors, and that we're trusted; all of which I look upon as things which I've helped to achieve."

Looking back on the changes the Islands have undergone during his six and a half years here, he is quick to mention the trivial, such as "... not needing ten minutes to drive along Ross Road anymore, or receiving television programmes that are merely a few hours behind, as opposed to two weeks."

The biggest change in his view however is "...how much maturity and confidence people are showing compared to when I arrived here. People are so sure of themselves and of their future now. the change has been phenomenal."

"I would like that to be taken a step further so that people are that confident more regularly overseas. My own view is that they should consider South America, taking that view across and being more proactive rather than reac-

Mr Jarvis' next appointment is Montserrat in the Caribbean, where he will take up a similar posting as in the Falklands as deputy governor.

Amongst his duties will be the difficult task of liaising in the reconstruction of the Island after the volcanic eruptions that began in 1995.

As he describes. "The fact that Montserrat is almost entirely dependent on UK aid now means that there will be tensions due to the different ways in which people will want to see that

far as possible.

As for the future of the Falklands Mr Jarvis doesn't predict any great change, "Perhaps there will be changes in technology available in the Islands; and the possibility of two weekly flights might mean increased tourism and exposure, but I can't see any vast change taking place.'

Mr Jarvis will also be continuing his interest in South Georgia after he leaves the Islands when he plans to ioin the South Georgia Association.

As for the Island's future he said. "I would like to see South Georgia gaining World Heritage status, as well as receiving Marine Stewardship council certification. Perhaps there could also be an increase in environmentally friendly tourism, though it would be the responsibility of the government to keep its impact to a

"Being part of the community." is what he'll miss most from the Falklands, "... things like taking four hours to do your weekly shop because of stopping to talk to everyone you know in the shop, or driving down the road and waving to everyone you pass... I've never had that in any of the places I've been before."

Mr Jarvis can definitely see himself coming back to the Falklands for a holiday and his son, Andrew, who will be starting at Peter Symonds College this coming September, plans to return at some point during academic holidays.

"The Falklands" he warns, "have not seen the last of the Jarvises."



Recipes for the Falkland Islands Lamb Tagine - Elizabeth Villalon

WHAT to cook? How do you decide?

Go onto the Internet and find a title that catches your eye? Brian's Belly? Thyme in the Kitchen. Pukka Tukka?

How about Sam Choy and his Hawaiian cookery? He produces normal dishes with a real twister in the tail. Irish Stew with 20 cloves of garlic, Corned Beef and Iau Iu,

Ingredients

- 1 Tbsp ground ginger
- 2 tsp black pepper
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 Tbsp turmeric
- 1 1/2 Tbsp paprika
- 1/2 tsp chilli powder
- 2 ½ lb cubed lamb/mutton
- 1 lb onions
- 3 cloves garlic
- ⅓ tsp salt
- 5 Tbsp olive oil
- 175g/6oz apricots
- 50g/2oz raisins or sultanas
- 85g/3oz toasted flaked almonds
- 1 Tbsp honey
- 300ml/1/2 pint tomato juice
- 400g can tomatoes
- 300ml/ ½ pint hot stock

Chamoro Bread Pudding.

I suppose this could be a candidate too - mutton stew with fruit?

A tagine is the stew of Northem Africa, named after the earthenware dishes with conical lids in which they are cooked and served.

However, if you've temporarily mislaid yours, then a large frying pan and casserole dish will suffice!

Method

- · Heat the oven to 170C Gas 3.
- · Mix the spices and meat in a glass bowl, coating the meat evenly.
- · Grate the onions. Crush the garlic. Mix to a paste with the salt.
- · Heat some of the oil in a pan and brown the meat in small batches. Place into a casserole dish.
- When the meat is all browned add the onion and garlic to absorb the pan juices.
- · Stir until soft then add to the casserole dish.
- · Add all the other ingredients and cook slowly for 2 hours until the meat is soft.
- · Serve with couscous to be authentic or rice or mash.

Guidelines for baby's holiday by Margaret Grebby

The Journey

WHEN you are travelling, carry essential items in a large shoulder

If you won't be able to warm food en route, try and get your baby used to eating unwarmed food straight from the container a day or so before you go.

Cans are less bulky than jars and are unbreakable, but do not keep any unused food once the container has been opened.

If breast feeding, stick to your usual routine

If bottle feeding, take prepared feeds in an insulated 'cool' bag, a thermos flask of hot water and a small container in which to warm the feeds.

Keep to your child's normal routine of eating and sleeping wherever possible.

If your child is prone to travel sickness, talk to your doctor or pharmacist before you go.

For older children take a bag containing toys, pens, paper, books to keep them occupied.

Cars and coaches:

 Check how often the coach stops and for how long and plan your trip accordingly.

• If you have a long journey, it is a good idea to travel at night.

 Allow extra time for stops so that children can stretch their legs and use the potty.

Cassette tapes can be a great success - even if they're not to your taste, they're less tedious than bored children.

 Always be aware of safety in the car. Seat belts are compulsory in Britain and many European countries.

 Carry-cots should be strapped into position and toddlers should sit in special car seats.

 Small children should never sit in the front seat.

Trains:

◆Take expressed milk if you do not want to breast-feed on the train.

 Consider reserving seats near the restaurant car, if there is one, since bottles or baby foods can be heated for you.

Travelling midweek means



more space and can be cheaper. Planes:

 Check the airline's facilities, such as sky cots, before you book, and make sure the airline knows you are travelling with a baby or small

•The stewardess can find you some privacy if you want to breastfeed.

● Take some extra food with you for your child.

 Take one piece of hand luggage, containing all essential s.

 Give your child a drink, or something to chew during takeoff and landing.

Ships

· A night crossing on a channel ferry may be easier than daytime if you book a cabin.

 If going on a long boat trip, find out what facilities are offered for babies and small children and let them know when booking if you need a high chair, cot or any other equipment.

 Take your own folding pram or buggy with sun canopy.

Reins are a must for an adventurous toddler.

●Don't rely on fresh milk at sea - take a supply of baby's milk

Going Abroad

Passports:

Even a baby needs his own passport. Apply at least 6 weeks in advance to be safe. Make sure your children's routine vaccinations are up-to-date, and any others you may require. Your GP will advise you. Also, make sure you have all the necessary insurance cover for your trip abroad.

When you are abroad:

do not use local milk; take your own baby milk,

- make sure all water is boiled, - take baby foods with you, it's not always possible to buy baby

foods abroad. - don't let children stay in the sun without covering them, and always use high factor suncreams,

- make sure your baby has extra drinks,

- do take along a few familiar toys,

- do attach identification labels to small children in crowded places, - do remember fresh air often

relieves travel sickness, - do carry a first aid kit (kept

away from small fingers).

Other items:

GENERAL OVERVIEW

Lack of wool supply will continue to impact on world wool markets during the next 12 months or so according to industry analysts. This belief was expressed after Australian Wool Innovation reported that the Australian shorn wool production (for the 2003/2004 season) is forecast to decline from this years low of 490 million kilograms to an even lower 470 million kilograms.

British Quotations for Tops

British top quotations reflected the greasy wool markets of the world, with quotations falling marginally at the finer and broader end of the micron spectrum but remaining firm in the mid-micron range.

Australian Market

Greasy wool prices in Australia fell at the finer end of the micron scale (less than 24 micron) but remained quite firm at the broader end.

Erratic wool supply was identified as a major issue affecting the market and was once again blamed for a fall in the market. Buvers felt unhappy with the volatile nature of wool offerings and expressed their dissatisfaction with the tendency for growers to quickly withdraw wool from the market when prices fail to reach their expecta-

In total 47,823 bales of wool were offered for sale during the week, with just over 34,507 bales purchased by the trade. Pass in rate averaged 27.6%.

Included in the offering were 3,521 bales of crossbred wool, of which 2,999 bales were sold. (pass in rate 14.0%).

New Zealand

The market tone was reported "easier" for fleece wools broader than 27.5 micron (down approximately 1%), but firmer for finer fleece lots (up 1%).

Auctions next week

75,000 bales of wool are scheduled for sale in Australia in the upcoming week. No sales are scheduled in New Zealand or South Africa

Stable rules for Argentine oil?

THE drop in Argentina's oil and natural gas reserves, and the need for "clear and stable rules of the game" was highlighted during the "Hydrocarbons Congress 2003" that is currently taking place in Buenos Aires.

"We're concerned that primary information indicates that oil reserves have fallen 2% and natural gas 10%, which leads us to stress that we must act with determination and celerity to preserve Argentina's oil industry", indicated Oscar Vicente president of the Congress.

Mr. Vicente stressed that "country and industry need adequate economic conditions plus clear and stable rules of the game that enable the sustained and long term investments Argentina needs to keep growing".

The congress is organized by the Argentine Oil and Gas Institute, IAPG the main grouping of the Argentine oil industry

Mr. Vicente pointed out that in the last two decades Argentina managed to attain self sufficiency in oil production and successfully faced the industry's globalization and fierce foreign competition.

"In the last decade of the twentieth century the oil industry invested 41 billion US dollars in Argentina that helped increase production, reserves and made us an important oil and natural gas exporter", said Mr. Vicente.

"We're going through difficult moments, but the technological advances of our industry have held us firmly, clearly positioned in the world, with immense potential growth and a leading role in the region", added Mr. Vicente who then again insisted in requesting "a clear horizon, free of uncertainties that will enable us to reduce risks and re-establish our trust in the institutions".

Well done for Kirchner and Lavagna

AN overwhelming majority of Argentines, 83.5%, believe the country's situation will improve and a similar percentage consider President Nestor Kirchner is doing a "good or very good" job, according to the latest opinion poll published this Sunday in the Buenos Aires press.

The opinion poll done by OPSM/Zuleta Puceiro also indicates that 19.9% of those interviewed consider the current Argentine situation as "bad": 49.9% "fairly good" and 21.1% "good".

Regarding Mr. Kirchner's job so far, 57% describe it as "good" and 25.4% "very good" totalling 83.9%.

Mr Enrique Zuleta Puceiro commenting on the results said that after a month long honey moon with public opinion, common to most governments, "...the Kirchner administration is entering into a new scenario where apparently there's a certain convergence with its values, objectives and policies."

This week's opinion poll results are virtually unchanged from those a week ago.

However who really soared from last week was Minister of Economy Roberto Lavagna whose approval rating went from 57.9% to 63.8% among those who believe he's doing a "good" or "very good" job; and from 18.7% to 30.6% among who consider his performance as "fair".

Growing crime rates in Chile

CHILEAN authorities have publicly expressed their concern at the growing number of robberies and violent crimes as described in an official Ministry of Interior (Home Secretary) report.

The report indicates that during the first quarter of 2003 the number of violent crimes reported increased 36.2% compared to the same period a year ago.

Minister of Interior Jose Miguel Insulza admitted the "seriousness" of the situation in spite of the increase in police controls because, "...when we have this number of crimes, there's no way we can feel satisfied with our job."

Major crimes in Chile such as armed robberies, kidnapping, mugging, rape and homicides increased 11.02% between January-March 2003 over the first quarter of 2002.

A non government organization, Citizens Peace Foundation which regularly monitors the level of crimes in Chile said it was concerned with the government report as it confirms, "...we're in the same ascending tendency we have seen for the last few years."

Mr Gonzalo Vargas, spokesperson for the Citizens Peace Foundation reiterated a recent report from the organisation warning that Chile runs the serious risk of not being any longer a secure country, "...if the growth rate of crime persists at its present level, 66% increase in the last five years."

Actually, Mr Insulza is among the worst rated cabinet ministers because of growing crime and the extended feeling of insecurity among Chilean citizens.

MERCOPRESS

Lan Chile accused in Congress

SANCTIONS, changes in Lan Chile's corporate structure and legal modifications regarding air rates was petitioned before the Congressional Anti Monopoly Committee by Chilean Deputies and private organizations from Punta Arenas.

The request delivered in Congress includes a long list of alleged illegal actions and irregularities committed by Lan Chile and a critical report from the Chilean Consumers Office.

Deputy Zarko Luksic who belongs to the Congressional Transport Committee meeting with the press said that "we're asking the government to urgently sponsor a legislative modification to the legal system for establishing air travel prices and rates in line with the Bill governing telecommunications, given the number of consumers involved in the demand"

"If market conditions are not enough to guarantee free market air rates for air travel and transport, following indications from the Anti Monopoly Committee, this Committee should be entitled to annul or establish the price of these services. The current existent imperfect competition situation has grown to the extent that it has become an absolute monopoly", said Mr. Luksic an persistent critic of Lan Chile's air service to Punta Arenas, which he represents in Congress.

The request also asks the controlling corporation of Lan Chile S.A. and Ladeco S.A. to divest its share participation in one of the two companies and that Lan Chile splits its four main businesses, international air travel, national air travel; international freight and national freight into four independent societies.

As to air rates, petitioners demand an end to crossed subsidies, particularly between national passenger travel and the other activities of the Lan-Ladeco Corporation

Finally the request demands that both Lan Chile and Ladeco be fined to the extent of the law for all the irregularities committed.

WITH the purpose of promoting southern Chile world wide and attracting tourism. Punta Arenas authorities officially presented last week the new portal Patagonia Chile www.Patagonia-Chile.com.

The ceremony was held in the local Magallanes Regional Museum with the participation of tourist industry representatives and Mr. Bernardo Troncoso head of the regional Economic Office who pointed out the relevance of the English-Spanish portal which has abundance of information. illustrations and maps of the area.

Miguel Angel Muñoz head of the regional Tourist Office indicated that the operation demanded an investment of approximately 12.000 US dollars jointly financed by national, regional and private funde

Mr Muñoz said that a significant number of tourists arriving in Chilean Patagonia collect information on the area through internet and therefore the need to have a top quality official portal. He added that in a near future further languages, such as German, Japanese, will be incorporated.

Miguel Oyarzo from Austro Internet the company responsible for the design and setting up of the portal revealed that currently there are 300,000 web pages world wide that include the word Patagonia and, "...our challenge is that www.Patagonia-Chile.com rapidly is placed among the top twenty."

Mr Oyarzo said that during the month long trial the portal received over 4,000 visits.

Corriedale breeders host workshop

ORGANISED by the Chilean Corriedale Breeders Association, a workshop on wool classification and management with the participation of Uruguayan experts is being held in Punta Arenas.

Over fifty farmers have registered for the workshop that includes conferences and practical courses and will extend until July 11

The event is sponsored by Pro-Chile the official Chilean export promotion office. Patricio Almonacid regional president of the breeders association said that Corriedale wool represents 45% of Magallanes exports and underlined that after a dreadful decade, "...wool again has a bullish market and therefore our interest in improving the quality and presentation of our local production."

The two Uruguayan agronomists work in Montevideo for SUL, the local branch of the International Wool Secretariat, and are experts in wool and bail presentation.

Three medals for Falklands

Patrick Watts sums up the NatWest Island Games in Guernsey

DESPITE having the third smallest population of the competing 23 member islands, the Falklands finished in sixteenth position in the final medal table at the tenth NatWest Island Games in Guernsey.

The silver and two bronze medals, won in shooting events, was the best return for the Falklands, since the 1999 Games in Gotland. Graham Didlick clearly established himself as the most successful competitor since the Falklands first participated in the Island Games in 1993. His silver medal in the Police Pistol 1 competition, and bronze in the NPA Service Pistol B discipline, brings his tally of medals to eleven. This impressive total comprises one gold, four silver, and six bronze.

Shooters Gareth Goodwin and Chris McCallum maintained the Falklands' excellent reputation in full-bore rifle shooting, winning a well-deserved bronze medal in the Queens Pairs competition. After narrowly heading the Isle of Wight on the first day, they opened up a 36 points gap by the end of the second day, so ensuring an early medal for the Falklands.

Gareth finished a creditable sixth in the Individual Shoot with a score of 381, while Chris was seventh on 377.

In addition to the three medals, the Falklands also picked up a gold certificate, through Saul Pitaluga in the ISSF Automatic Ball Trap Clay Pigeon event. The Small Islands Certificates were introduced at the 2001 Games and involve the six islands with populations of 10.000 or less.

The Alderney, Sark, Froya, Hitra, St Helena and Falklands teams, while aiming to win gold, silver or bronze medals, also participate in a 'Small Islands' competiton, with gold, silver and bronze certificates being awarded to the highest placed 'Small Islands' competitor, provided that three or more of the Islands are entered in the respective discipline.

Saul's score of 101, twelfth position from a field of 27 shooters, earned him the gold certificate with Richard Grubb of Şark, just three

points behind, getting the silver.

Glenn Ross demolished the Falklands golf records in Guernsey. His 322 four round total (39th position from a field of 50) was 27 strokes better than the previous record of 349 held jointly by Robert Titterington and Roy Smith. Glenn also lowered the one round score, previously 82, with a 77 on the first day of competiton, and took another stroke off this on the following day.

However Roy Smith battled back from his opening 100, with a second round of 76 to now jointly hold the record with Glenn.

Roy finished in 49th position with his 348. Kevin Clapp in 47th position with 339, bettered the old record by ten strokes.

Sharon Marsh completed the tricky La Grande Mare and L'Ancresse golf courses with a four round total of 396 and 39th position, just one stroke more than her total of 395 in the Isle of Man Games of 2001.

The competitive nature of the Games, and thrilling pool atmosphere inspired young swimmers Donna Triggs and Kerri Ross to achieve personal bests in all nine events which they entered.

Kerri won her heat in the 50m Breaststroke in a time of 50.23 secs, while Donna finished second in her heat of the 100m Freestyle with a time of 1.13.58.

The Badminton team of Doug Clark, Ian France, Trudi Clarke, Lyn Brownlee and Nikki Luxton, produced the best ever overall Games performance. They narrowly lost 3-2 to

Bermuda in a play-off match for losing group teams.

Doug won two singles matches in the group rounds against Orkney and Gibraltar, while also recording a first ever Falklands singles victory in the Open event, progressing to the second round before losing to an Aland player.

Sarah Allan took eleventh place, in a field of seventeen, in the Half-Marathon. Her time of the 36-lfomins bettered her previous Games best by almost six minutes. Her battling performance won her the Chairman's 'Peformance of Merit' medal.

David Fyfe settled for 26th position, with a time of 1hr 34.03 in the Mens Half-Marathon. He had a gruelling week, also running in the 10.000 and 5,000m events.

Roxanne Morrison (16) savoured her first-ever opportunity to run on a 400m track, and her impressive 6'-03secs in the 1,500m, is a time to build on for the future.

Kyle Biggs (17) tackled both the 400 and 800m events. Aiming to go under 1 minute in the 400m he gamely produced a fast finish to record a time of 59.44.

The 2005 NatWest Island Games will be held on the Shetland Islands, but sadly for the Falklands, the two medal-winning events in Guernsey, full-bore rifle and pistol, are not scheduled to be held.

Shetland does not have a full-bore range and strict police regulations prohibit the importation of pistols to the Scottish Island.

- News in brief

Revenue up

"FISHING revenue is up this financial year," confirmed Director of Fisheries John Barton yesterday.

He said revenue totalled £26.4 million, which is £3.6 million more than originally estimated. Mr Barton explained that some of that money represents late licence payments from the 2002 season.

Mr Barton returned this week from a meeting in London of the 23rd South Atlantic Fisheries Commission meeting. The Commission comprises British and Argentine Delegations.

He said some progress had been made in terms of a high seas pact in that both sides had agreed that collection of data from ships fishing on the high seas was needed as well as that already being collected from their respective zones.

Mr Barton said, if a multilateral agreement is to be eventually reached, it would be helpful to have more accurate data, as currently there is argument between the Falklands and Argentina with regard to how much illex is being caught on the high seas.

Tributes to hero

TRIBUTES have been paid in the UK and in the Falkland Islands to a hero of the 1982 War who drowned while attempting to rescue his wife and child in a boating tragedy while on holiday in Cyprus.

Peter Rainey (49) a helicopter pilot and night goggles expert, saw from the beach his wife and son thrown from a dinghy in rough seas. He attempted to rescue them but eventually died along with his wife. His son Callum survived.

Falklands poll

A POLL contracted by President Kirchner's administration to monitor public response to the government's decisions and announcements indicates that many Argentines still haven't forgotten the Falklands.

The poll indicated that 8 out of 10 interviewed favour the resumption of sovereignty talks over the Falklands with the UK. (MP)

Comment by Managing Editor Lisa Riddell



I SUSPECT there were number in our midst, apart from myself, who appreciated the irony that in the very week we were reeling from the government's decision on flights for terminations, a press release from FIG announced that a recent report on human rights issues in the Falklands was 'favourable'

It strikes me that if 'Social Development Direct' had left their visit until this year their comments on the government's decision to no longer pay for the flights therefore effectively limiting a women's access to a choice, might have been considered a lot less than 'favourable'.

Still, having spent the last week in a state of disbelief at, and disillusionment in, a system I have doggedly believed (occasionally against some odds) is essentially fair and progressive, it was of some small comfort to be reminded that on the whole it actually is.

Then again is it comforting, or does it in fact make things worse?

If we lived in a country where women were viewed as second class citizens, where the government was rife with corruption and decisions were made with no thought for the interests, wishes and values of the people, then such an odd decision would barely have caused a raised eyebrow.

But we do not live in such a country, do we?

I think it is safe to say that generally our councillors are approachable and genuinely concerned for the Islands and the people.

And despite occasional accusations to the contrary (for we are far from perfect and the Human Rights report highlights this) I think it fair to say that corruption is barely an issue. In fact apart from complaints about the politicians' tendency to dabble in areas best left to more qualified civil servants, on the whole, the governance of this small territory could rightfully be held up as an admirable example to the rest of the world.

So what on earth motivated such a blot on an almost immaculate copybook?

I am inclined to think the answer to that question will be a long time coming, but in the mean time our elected representatives still have the chance to restore our faith in them.

And I am quite certain that not one person would construe it as a weakness if councillors were, at the very least, prepared to look again at this issue, should it be shown that a generous proportion of the community are not in favour of the decision made.

Human Rights report `favourable'

A 'FAVOURABLE' report has been published following a visit by two consultants to the Falkland Islands 14 months ago to examine human rights issues, according to a press release from the Secretariat.

The report is part of a study commissioned by the Foreign and Com-monwealth Office and the Department for International Development to look at Human Rights issues in the UK Overseas Territories.

The consultants found that the Falkland Islands. "...can offer strong examples of good practice to other UK Overseas Territories, and indeed to the UK," and commends FIG's positive approach towards the protection and promotion of human

Access to legal aid, a generous attitude towards healthcare for foreign nationals, publication of committee reports and child abuse prevention are singled out for particular praise.

However, the consultants consider that areas of concern include the terms and conditions of employment of St. Helenian migrant workers, the treatment of foreign nationals working on Falkland Islands registered fishing vessels, some judicial issues and aspects of decision mak-

Whilst welcoming the positive findings in the report, FIG believe that some of the adverse comments are based on inaccurate and uncorroborated evidence.

Councillor Norma Edwards was, pleased to see that our record for dealing with injured and sick foreign nationals has been praised," and com-mented, "...we are examining how we can tighten up the law on health and safety issues aboard fishing vessels and always prosecute the master or other officers of foreign-flagged vessels where there is evidence of violence or mis-treatment of crew members

Councillor Jan Cheek also welcomed the report but was "concerned to note that there were examples of misrepresentation that had been pointed out to the authors following receipt of a draft some months ago but which haven't been corrected.

FIG Chief Executive. Chris Simpkins pointed out that the new Management Code, which is expected to be approved for introduction within a couple months, contains provisions which protect the freedom of speech of civil servants and provides a confidential process for improper conduct to be reported. Plans are also in hand to introduce a voluntary minimum wage Code of Practice which could be given the force of law if its provisions are not applied to all employees regardless

of nationality.

New approach to forward planning

THE Falkland Islands Government has approved a draft Development Plan which for the first time sets Island-wide planning policy for guiding development and the use of land.

This approval was given at the June meeting of Executive Council.

Councillor Richard Cockwell. Chairman of the Planning and Building Committee commented, "The Development Plan should prove an invaluable tool for all those interested in the future physical development of the Islands.

Environmental Planning Officer Anthony Lancaster told Penguin News, "The Development Plan is intended to provide a consistent basis for determining planning applications and to introduce certainty about where and what kinds of development may or may not be allowed over a number of years; otherwise know as the 'plan period'

All planning applications are judged against planning policies set out in the Development Plan. Planning law requires that the Development Plan policy is generally adhered to in determining planning applications, although other important circumstances can affect the final deci-

The Development Plan is in two parts: the Falkland Islands Structure Plan and the Stanley Town Plan. Both plans have a time-frame from 2001 to 2016.

Mr Lancaster said the Structure Plan applies to all the Falkland Islands and sets out the strategic framework for all planning decisions. It also contains policies that are more local in nature relating to Camp and is important as it also establishes the framework for the Stanley Town Plan

The Stanley Town Plan is a 'Local Plan' which interprets the broad Structure Plan policies at a defined local level in great detail often for specific sites.

Mr Lancaster added, "In Stanley, the Local Plan is probably the most important document you will need to look at before preparing your plan-

ning application. He said, "The Plan contains a detailed Policies and Proposals Map for Stanley, linked to written policies in the Plan, which specify the way in which development may or may not be permitted. Some policies may prohibit development in certain areas or circumstances altogether, whilst others will establish detailed criteria which must be satisfied if development is to be allowed. This is the same format as in the Structure Plan.

What next? During the next two to three months it is planned to hold meetings in Stanley and Camp to explain in more detail aspects of the Development Plan. If, after reading the Plan, people have concerns about certain aspects, or alternatively wish to support specific policies, they can do so using the response form available on the CD, from the web or from the Environmental Planning Department.

All responses should be received at the Environmental Planning Department by 26 September 2003.

Charges follow accident

A YOUNG Stanley man pleaded guilty on Wednesday to charges of reckless driving and driving under the influence of alcohol.

Prosecutor Graham Cripps told the court that on Sunday evening Derek McGill (22) was seen by witnesses turning from Dean Street on to John Street and then heard to be accelerating.

A number of pedestrians were crossing the road at the time and although Mr McGill tried to brake. he could not avoid colliding with one

The pedestrian, Darrel Ford, was thrown back by the impact and left unconscious on the road. Mr Ford was taken to the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital by emergency services and kept in overnight for observation. He did not sustain serious injuries and was released the next

Police breathalysed Mr McGill at the scene of the accident, where he tested positive for alcohol. He was then taken to the police station where he gave two further readings. the lowest being 100mg of alcohol per 100ml of breath.

Mr Cripps added that this case was, "...one of the most serious drink driving cases I've presented to the

Defence lawyer Rory Gilchrist told the court that on the day in question Mr McGill had drunk seven or eight cans of cider during lunch and had since been home to sleep.

Mr Gilchrist explained that, although Mr McGill felt fine at the time, he understands the grave error he committed.

He added that Mr McGill understood the seriousness of the incident and was very sorry for what had happened.

Senior Magistrate Nick Sanders described the case as too serious to be dealt with a fine and driving disqualification and remanded Mr McGill on bail. Sentencing was adjourned until July 30 awaiting presentencing reports.

Other court news

Two Russian fishermen were each fined £300 in court last week and ordered to pay £50 towards prosecution costs

Serhiy Rastikhin and Andriy Druzhynin pleaded guilty on July 4 to attempting to take a vehicle without the owner's consent.

'Actively Women': bring back funding for termination flights

FALKLANDS residents have been. hugely supportive," of a petition introduced in the wake of the government's announcement that women are to be charged by the Health Service for the cost of a flight to Britain for a pregnancy termina-

A termination of pregnancy procedure is not provided in the Falkland Islands, and as a result government have historically paid for the cost of the £1000 flight.

Debbie Summers, a spokesperson for the action group 'Actively Women' formed last week, said. "This decision places a very effective obstacle in the way of a woman's right to choose a termination.

Speaking of the petition she said. "So far we have spent less than four

hours seeking signatures for the petition that asks government to revoke their decision, and by noon on Thursday we had 279 signatures of support.

If you want to sign the petition you can call in to Sulivan Shipping or Penguin News, or you can email or fax us." (See back page advert for further information)

She added. "Some government employees have expressed concern that they cannot sign a peition that challenges their employer, however, I have been advised that only senior employees who are directly responsible for carrying out the policy might be affected in this way

Anybody outside of the Health Service is not affected and nor are the large majority of employees

within the service who are not directly involved in the carrying out of these policies.

Banners provided by the group are springing up in shops, private houses and car windows.

Debbic said, "We entirely appre-

ciate the difficulties councillors and managers face with regard to budgets, but the last Chief Executive stated clearly that any priority based budgeting would not undermine our health system - so why is this happening? The hospital budget has increased so why can't we afford something that has always been paid for?

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

Uncivilised decision Let the public have its say

I FIND it very sad that the community I have chosen to live in, an apparently civilised community, in the year 2003, has made the decision to cut funded flights for those seeking a termination.

This decision is ill-considered and short-sighted on several fronts:

· Socially · Politically · Economically

Socially:
As others have indicated in last week's PN, the message we are sending to women is: You've made your bed, so now you can lie on it?' For most woman, young or

on it? For most woman, young or mature, in the event of an unwanted pregnancy, abortion is an ultimate, and potentially traumatic, decision. It does not go away like yesterday's headlines.

The decision to refuse payment of flights for non-clinical terminations, for the 'casual', does nothing but add to the shame, grief and trauma. It is not only a question of money, it is a moral judgement.

I think I am in strong position to voice my opinion in this debate.

I am a member of a family which has been personally affected by an abortion in this community

In my capacity as teacher and tutor at the Secondary School, I am involved with young women and their sexual concerns, on a day-today basis.

I am presently writing a Sex and Relationships Policy for the Senior School

I am presently a member of a teenage health committee, in conjunction with the hospital, which deals with the many issues which teenagers encounter in the year 2003, from gender relationships to sexually informative education, (or in the Falklands, in recent years, the lack of such educational provision), on this subject – a committee from which I am now considering resigning

With others, who spoke out in last week's PN. I can only agree that abortion is the *end* of the road, not, for one moment, contemplated at conception, accidental, careless, casual, or not. It is to the credit and the courage of several women in this community, who, when they learned of this family's crisis, telephoned or got in touch to ask what they could do to help; women of whose history I was ignorant. Unasked, they volunteered their support in our situation. Thank you

That there is a growing casualness towards termination, a view attributed to one councillor in last week's P.V. is an almost farcical statement in that, last year, less than 1% of pregnancies in the Falklands ended in termination. Hardly a growing trend or abuse of state provision.

Politically:

Politically: this decision is a retrograde step, and when news of it reaches the international arena, (as it will – we are no longer an ignored spot on the globe), we are going to look backward and reactionary.

One of the main focuses of frustration, which will undoubtedly strike the electorate, is the cavalier manner in which the people of this community have been, yet again, ignored:

a) by services to which we all contribute financially

b) by people we elected to represent us, our views and opinions

Yes, councillors wrote manifestos which, hopefully, encouraged the electorate to vote for them, but manifestos, as we all know, are 'vote-getters'; or sermons to the already-converted. No way are they a free pass to speak or think for us on issues which affect our rights as human beings, without any form of consultation or consensus.

Where are we going with such judgements? Is the drunk, who falls down and breaks an arm or a leg, to be refused treatment because the injury was self-inflicted? Is the addicted smoker to die in agony because he will be refused treatment for his self-inflicted lung cancer? We are all guilty of human frailty and who is to be our judge? God forbid, any presently elected councillor, judges me.

'Let he who is without sin, cast the first stone'. (John: Chapter 8 Verse 7)

Economically:

If the statistic, that government funded two flights for terminations last year are correct, government will save £2000; maybe on a 'bad' year, a little more. Set against some other areas of spending in this community, areas where the word accountability is hardly the watchword, this sum is a nonsense. But let me not go down that road. I think the cartoon on the front page of last week's PN dealt more than adequately with that one.

If government elects to send moral or health messages to the electorate, please don't clothe those messages in spurious economics. If they wish to impart moral or health messages to the electorate, let them instead put their money where their mouths are. As I said earlier, abortion is the end of a sad

When last was money spent to deal effectively with the issues of early sex and the consequences of that?

When last was money spent on an informative, and pro-active programme to alert young women to the hazards of taking the contraceptive pill from an early age?

When last was money spent to deal informatively with the spread of sexually transmitted diseases, which can only be prevented or minimised by the use of condoms?

(Yes, folks, horror of horrors, STDs do exist in the Falklands).

When last was money spent on even considering the possibility that HIV and AIDS could cause devastation to our small community?

Veronica Fowler GET REAL COUNCILLORS. LIVE IN THE YEAR 2003. LAST week the Medical Department published a list of services and treatments which will be rationed in the future.

That is to say, a list of services which FIG will no longer fund. The targets chosen were: Viagra (sildenafil), Nicotine patches, flights for termination of pregnancy, spectacles for most adults, and part of residential care in hospital

Rationing is inevitable in health care, because governments cannot afford to write a blank cheque for all the growing number of treatments which might be desirable for their citizens in an ideal world.

Whatever we think about their choice, those who made the decision to ration these services should at least be commended for making the rationing explicit. Much rationing in health care occurs quietly, wrapped up in the mysteries of medical decision making. It is better that we have clear guidelines that everyone understands, to ensure that everyone is treated equally.

Why and how were these particular five services chosen? Is the rationing rational? Who should be consulted and involved in decisions about rationing health care?

But:

If rationing is to be acceptable in a democracy like ours, we need to be assured that the decisions made are rational and based on good evidence. Guidelines for rationing should be accessible to the public, and the reasons for making the decisions should be explained. Why should the public, the taxpayer and the patient accept decisions taken behind the closed doors of a committee?

Obviously, not everyone can be involved and consulted on every detail of health policy. In general 1 am sure it is appropriate that we have a committee with members of the public, councillors, medical managers and clinicians represented, to consider these things and come to decisions.

But priority setting and rationing in health is a big issue, which ought to reflect the values of the whole community. For this reason there should be genuine consultation with the public. It is sometimes argued that public input can lead to bizarre decisions, and that we should not make resource allocation decisions on the basis of illinformed public opinion. I do not believe this. UK health economists are devoting considerable energy to developing questionnaire based methods of consulting the public about their values concerning priority setting. To deny us a say in these issues strikes at the heart of democracy.

Take Viagra. It is the first effective oral treatment available for erectile dysfunction, a very common condition where adequate erections cannot be achieved. It affects 1 in 10 men and causes distress, depression and relationship

problems. A large number of medical conditions, such as diabetes and high cholesterol, as well as side effects of commonly prescribed drugs can cause it.

Men with erectile dysfunction are reluctant to talk about it to doctors, let alone wave placards and banners and demand their rights. Are they an easy target? Will there be a Men's Action Group? Why can I still prescribe Alproprostadil injections, a more expensive and less effective treatment for erectile dysfunction?

How should we decide what to ration? How do we compare Viagra, an effective drug for a common and distressing condition, with Simvastatin, another effective but costly treatment for high cholesterol? How can we compare it with the contraceptive pill, which enables women to control their fertility, or with acne treatment, or the cost of a new anaesthetic machine? What about cataract surgery? How do we compare quality of life with length of life?

These are not easy questions but there are ways to answer them. There are recognised methods to calculate and compare the cost effectiveness of medical treatments and drugs. Following the debacle over Viagra in the UK, the government established the National Institute for Clinical Excellence, to do exactly that and look at the cost effectiveness of new treatments. One of the cheapest ways of saving lives? Help people stop smoking. Which takes us to nicotine

patches. This letter is quite long enough and I am sure some of your other correspondents will mention termination of pregnancy (TOP), but I would like to highlight a few facts. There is no evidence to suggest that TOP is used as an alternative to contraception. Most unwanted pregnancies are due to contraceptive failure. There is clear evidence that poor access to safe TOP leads to an increase in deaths from unsafe illegal abortion. Although it is not actually illegal here, termination of pregnancy is going to be less accessible than in most countries where it is illegal. How do you get a TOP if you live in Ireland? You get on the plane to London. How do you get a TOP if you live in the Falklands? You get on the plane to London. Dublin to Heathrow return costs about £80 with Ryanair. I understand that the decision to stop funding flights for terminations was not made for moral reasons. On what grounds is access to termination of pregnancy less important than access the other procedures we send people to the UK for?

Rights violated for sake of £2000

I THINK it is disgraceful that in this day and age women's rights should be so much in question that they dominate the front page of our weekly paper.

Incidentally, I have been trying hard to think of an equivalent traumatic decision and medical operation that a man would go through, but other than the removal of a testicle, I cannot

To say that women use abortion as contraception is very narrow minded and I don't believe any of us here however young and naive would say "_oh its okay if I get pregnant FIG will pay for me to have it aborted

I was actually quite impressed that only up to two women a year. for whatever reason, are having terminations, and it follows that our youngster's in particular are very responsible with regard to contraception, particularly bearing in mind the number of unwanted pregnancies and teenage parents in the

I would like to point out, however, that in at least one way efficient contraception is not so readily accessible here as in the UK.

In Britain a sixteen year old girl can confidentially go to her doctor and ask to be put on the pill without her mother's consent.

While I do not suggest that all young girls should be on the pill, and it is a better situation if they have their parent's permission; still

in this small community, where little is confidential - I refer to the community as a whole rather than the Medical Department - it is intimidating to do something against the wishes of parents when the likelihood is they might find out. (The girl might even be spotted in the waiting room!).

If our female doctor had private clinics where youngsters could go and discuss contraception options it might encourage them to be even more responsible. Also condoms - how about a vending machine somewhere public - the Town Hall toilets or Jetty Centre so that the younger and more shy individuals don't have to deal with having to accept them from another per-

However, the whole point of this letter is to say I think it is disgraceful to violate women's rights by making it very expensive and difficult to arrange an abortion, there must be other ways to save the measly £2,000.

Surely we pay for a professional manager for the hospital to help increase and improve services. not gradually phase them out? It seems a strange sort of logic to pay someone to make things worse for

Finally, why can't there be medical staff trained to undertake the procedure here?

'Unbalanced' presentation of issue

I REFER to the front-page article, editorial and lengthy letter which appeared in the Penguin News on Friday 4 July 2003.

I am happy that Penguin News has chosen to highlight the issue of abortion flights to the UK, which is very much a legitimate matter of public debate and interest. I am, though, very concerned at the unbalanced way this important matter has been presented, and in particular that emotion is being used

to muddy the issues.

Mentions of 'mechanical rape' 13 yr. olds being asked to find £2,000 to fund abortions, references to self-induced abortions, unjustified accusations of patronising attitudes, and assumptions that those involved don't understand the issues are both insulting to the Islands community and plain wrong. As completely wrong, indeed, as Ms Bellhouse's wholly mistaken presumption that she knows the views of me or any other person involved. She doesn't. She has never asked me nor, I would suspect, anyone else involved either so I don't think that her comments have any validity.

I must also disagree with you on your comments about multiple abortions. This was discussed, as an entirely separate issue, quite some time ago. There is a very simple answer to that problem, if the problem exists, and it does not involve withdrawal of abortion flights.

Although there are, no doubt. those who would question where FIG's responsibility for others' actions in relation to unwanted pregnancies should start and finish, this was never raised as an issue. On the contrary, FIG support for abortion has never been questioned. The decision that we should no longer support abortion flights has nothing to do with the rights or wrongs of abortions. It is about what the Health Service spends its budget

It is entirely misleading to seek to link this issue, in peoples' minds. with spending on road plant (presumably for camp and MPA roads). the abattoir and vehicles. We could spend all those funds and much more on health - for example, on cancer support or treatment, or on scanners, or on premature babies, or on neurosurgery, or on Occupational Therapy for the elderly . the list of potential pri-

orities is almost endless. Nor is it simply a matter of finding an extra £4,000 a year. If we had an extra £4.000, would we choose to spend it on abortion flights or on other priorities? Most likely it would be spent on other priorities from that almost endless list. In fact, arguably the whole FIG budget could be spent on health! In reality, however. FIG spending on health is about right by any reasonable comparison.

The true link between funding and abortion flights is with the funding used for Medical Treatment Overseas (MTOs), which we use to send people overseas for treatment and which is the budget we used for abortion flights. Stripped of emotion and looked at logically, the issue is very simple:

Do we place flights for people who are ill including those who need abortions for medical reasons, at a higher priority than those who want abortions?" Our view is "Yes we do." The costs of abortion flights equal the costs of the same number of flights to send ill folk to the UK. At the end of the year, as we get towards the close of the budget, would we rather have sent an ill person to UK than someone wanting an abortion? Of course we would!

Finally, and rather sadly, I notice that the Penguin News, by accident rather than choice I would hope, nowhere raised the other side of womens' "right to choose" - the lack of support for those women in the Islands who may wish to give birth to their child but feel pressurised into having an abortion.

I appreciate that this letter is longer than you might wish for your letters page but, given the very extensive and high-profile cover of the matter in your last issue, I trust that you will be able to print it in full.

The third point relates to the particular issue of pregnancy termination.

For a start, I am sure that the vast majority of women who may be faced with the necessity of making this heartbreaking decision would not regard it casually.

There may be a few who do. but surely the whole point of a system such as ours is not to punish the majority for the sake of a

Until there is a perfect method of contraception, and the perfect individuals to use it perfectly everytime, I'm afraid that there will probably always be the necessity for termination.

Fnally, to suggest that withdrawing the payment for the flight may be an effective contraceptive must surely be a joke - it would be really funny if it was not so sad. Griz Cockwell.

Our man in Punta Arenas

WHILE even small children know who you've got to call if your New York apartment has ghosts, what might not be so well known is who you might call if, for example, you are English and wake up one morning in Puerto Natales, convinced that you might be pregnant, or worse, to discover that the good looking boy you met last night in the bar has, this morning, gone off with everything you own except your knickers.

These were both recent actual occurrences among the many that happen to young and somewhat careless British travelers in Southern Chile each summer. And who did these travelers in distress call? The answer is John Rees (pictured), Her Britannic Majesty's Consul in Punta Arenas.

John's consular duties, which have on occasion included arranging emergency medical treatment, have made him no stranger to Falkland Islanders over the years, and his other commercial activities have also frequently brought him into contact with the Islands.

For many years manager of the Broome shipping agency, and later area manager for the Avant Air Line until it ceased operations. John is now working with the management of the Jose Nogueira Hotel in Punta Arenas on their pioneering attempts

to offer fly-cruise visits to Antarc-

In this context, John is particularly hopeful that Falkland Islands residents will be excited by the November voyage advertised on page 17. This package, which is a special offer to Falkland Islanders and will need early expressions of interest to take place at all, will give to a lucky few the opportunity of combining a short Antarctic cruise with a few days in Chile either Christmas shopping or visiting the world-renowned Torres del Paine National Park. The trip, at a fraction of the price of the usual fly-cruise package from Punta to the Antarctic, will be accomplished from Stanley in the Oceanwide Expeditions ship, M/V Grigoriy Mikheev, which will drop its passengers at the Chilean settlement on King George Island.

From there they will have the opportunity to explore a little corner of the great white continent before being flown back to Punta Arenas via Cape Horn, in a four-engined de Haviland Dash 7, similar to the one used by the British Antarctic Survey

Meeting John, it is hard to accept that he has not himself recently arrived in these southern parts, so clearly do his musical voice, energy and cheerfulness indicate that here is a genuine leek-eating, daffodilwearing Welsh man.



In fact, John was born in Santiago and educated at the famous Grange School there. His Welsh origins, pronounced accent and appearance are inherited from his grandparents, who emigrated from Cardiff to the north of Chile, where his grandfather was employed in the copper mining industry.

To further confuse, after leaving Santiago, John spent a further eighteen years in the medical publishing business in Mexico, where he developed amongst other things a passion for cooking and the use of the strong flavours typical of that country.

Fortunately for British interests in the Magallanes Region, before

leaving for Mexico, John took the wise precaution of marrying a girl from Punta Arenas, whose father, as it turned out, was also in the British consular service.

Returning to Punta with his wife in 1984 on the death of her father, it was not too long before John found himself called to follow in his father-in-law's footsteps. It was a classic case of putting, "...a round peg in a round hole." An enthusiast for Punta Arenas, John clearly delights in its small town nature and knows and is known by practically everybody.

Apart from administering the pensions of British war veterans, looking after medical cases and the afore-mentioned damsels in distress. John is available as a resource for the representation of British interests in the south of Chile in whatever capacity might be required.

He describes his role as "great fun" not least because, "...I get to meet so many people." In recent times, these have included Governor Donald Lamont, Michael Portillo and the current Commander of British Forces in the Falkland Islands, Brigadier Jamie Gordon.

At the time of writing, John is assisting with the representation in Chile of the proposed Stanley-based FILO language school and eagerly looking forward to arranging the visit to the port of HMS Leeds Castle.

Golden Tapestry: group effort to celebrate Royal anniversary

VISITORS to the Susan Whitley Memorial Exhibition over the weekend had the opportunity to view an impressive tapestry piece on display at the Infant and Junior School.

The work of art was the school's contribution to the Golden Tapestry, celebrating Her Majesty the Queen's fifty years as head of the Commonwealth.

Over 250 schools throughout the Commonwealth were invited by the Millennium Tapestry Company to contribute to the project and teacher Ali Liddle said the staff at the Infant and Junior School felt it an honour to do so.

Mrs Liddle explained. "The theme of the Golden Tapestry is to celebrate everyday life, traditions and the environment of the country with a focus on the changing season of the year. It was felt that the nature and landscape of the Falkland Islands is so special and indeed unique that it was the obvious choice for the focus of our tapestry. The school was allocated the brief. The countryside and Nature Around Us' and encouraged to include the islands wildlife in the tapestry."

The staff at the school, under the early direction of Ruth Taylor, decided on an outline idea which was brought to life in a design by Mrs Liddle. She explained, "The design was intended to depict the familiar Stanley skyline, the unique stone runs, the Lady Elizabeth, which we felt was highly appropriate for the royal theme, our island environment and, of course, our variety of flora and fauna."

The designs for each item were outlined by Mrs Liddle but it fell to

each teacher and their children to bring the sketches to life. It is hoped that each child in school from Pre-School to Year 6 has contributed in some way whether it be sticking a sequin on or sewing a stitch.

The Golden Tapestry will now be packed up and sent back to the UK where it will be displayed at an exhibition in London. Upon its arrival it will be photographed and logged, ready to be displayed on the Golden Tapestry website for all to see. If you would like to keep track of the tapestry log on to www.millemium-tapestry.co.uk over the next few months and see when it appears.

From London, all the 250+ squares will travel to Australia to be exhibited at the Commonwealth Games in Melbourne in 2006. Mrs Liddle commented, "It's nice to know that the results of all the hard work by staff and pupils will be seen and appreciated by many thousands of people throughout the Commonwealth."

She added, "Although everybody in school has contributed to the Golden Tapestry some people need some special thanks for their efforts. The members of the Tapestry Club included Vicky Collier, Eva Velasquez, Craig Thain, Verity Livermore, Jane Clarke, Kaylee Smith, Danielle Caswell, Toni Jacobson, Marc Courtney, Robert George, Kelly Fiddes, Tansy Bonner and Andrea Sylvester-Peters.

"Special thanks also to Julic Courtney who joined in and got hooked and to Ruth Taylor who had the job of sewing all the class items onto the tapestry."








Report of the Planning and Building Committee held July 3, 2003

AS USUAL, the meeting of the Planning and Building Committee was chaired by the Hon Richard Cockwell and sitting with him were the Hon Norma Edwards. Les Harris, Paul Phillips and Mike

Apologies were received from Brian Summers, who is currently out of the Islands on business, and Mike Harris who is the new appointee taking over from Rikki Evans. In addition to the writer, two other members of the public attended the "open" session of the meeting which began promptly at 9am in the Liberation Room and lasted a little over one hour and a quarter.

In matters arising from the last meeting which was held in June. members noted that Executive Council had allowed the appeal of Mr and Mrs Stewart-Reid against the refusal of planning permission for development at their property at 41 Fitzroy Road, also that ExCo had approved the paper on the proposal to allow the issue of a building permit without detailed plans for certain minor works. An amendment to the Building Regulations should follow in due course to implement this procedure.

Before reviewing the first of twenty-five applications for the various forms of consent the Committee took note of the report of Antony Lancaster, the Environmental Planning Officer, on the Development Plan Consultation Programme. This sets out how the public are to be consulted in the period to run between 7 July and 26 September next and, importantly, points out that under the provisions of the Planning Ordinance the policies and proposals contained in the Draft Stanley Town Plan may be used by this Committee when determining applications for planning permission. The agenda for this Committee

meeting had taken on a further new look as it now contained a list of key policies relevant to each planning application, and where these did not conflict with those policies they were automatically recommended for approval, conditionally or otherwise.

Heading the list of applications to be reviewed were three for the renewal of temporary planning permission. These were in respect of some commercial development at the rear of 23 Fitzrov Road for Malcolm Jackson; overhead fibreoptic cables from PWD to the Secretariat and the KEMH along Ross Road and Cable Street for FIG; and for a telephone antenna on the Tax Office building off St Mary's Walk. again for FIG. All were further extended although in the case of the first this is to be subject to checks being made as to the actual uses to which the buildings are being put.

New applications

The following developments, all shown not to conflict with the Draft Stanley Town Plan, received planning permission (mostly with conditions attached): a warehouse at Gordon Lines for Fortuna Limited; off-street parking at 19 Jeremy Moore Avenue for John Rowland, a small Portakabin with dualpitched roof over at 11 Murray Heights for Robert Maddocks; an area of hardstanding for storage at Eliza Cove Road for the Department of Agriculture; a dwelling to be built at 21 Hansen Hill for Eddie Grimmer and Tamara Morrison: a garden shed at 8 Beaver Road for Alan and Trish Henry; an extension to their dwelling at 16 Jeremy Moore Avenue for Mr and Mrs Morgan Goss: permission in principle for a dwelling to be built on her land at 5 Narrows View for Angela Baber; a timber shed for storage at 3 Murray Heights for Miguel Hernandez (this building had already been erected and its external finishes are to be checked

for suitability); a dwelling to be built at 2 Anderson Drive for Mr and Mrs Ronnie Larsen. Also approved were an extension to their dwelling at 11 Ian Campbell Drive for Chris Gilbert and Sharon Lewis: the erection of a building on the site of an existing to again provide bed-sit accommodation at 4B Ross Road West for Julie Clarke: the change of use of part of the warehouse area of his premises at Plots 4 and 7 Lookout Industrial Estate to shop area, also the siting of a fuel tank, for Gordon Lennie; an extension to the Sand Bay Abattoir to form a permanent cold store and blast freezer facility for FIDC: the reclamation of land from the sea north of Crozier Place for the Falkland Islands Company Limited, and permission in principle for a double-steel framed building for leisure development at Bill Roberts Way for Julie Clarke and Kirsty Parry

Additionally, among the following applications considered were two submissions on the same area (north of the Old BFFI site) - the first for four dwellings with overhead cables submitted by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office. and the second for the access road and services for those buildings which was deposited by the FIG. These attracted three letters of objection, mainly from adjoining residents, all of whom were concerned at the perceived loss of access to their properties. Members looked carefully at the details submitted and resolved to approve both applications: in the case of the FIG application, subject to being satisfied that reasonable access would still be available to existing plots.

Stanley Electrical Limited's application for permission to extend their shop, workshop and store on Dean Street raised the issue of offstreet parking which, although shown to be extended from that already provided, was thought not

to be totally viable. It was agreed it should be left to the officers and, if found satisfactory, could be approved and reported back at the next meeting.

An application by Cable and Wireless to erect a new telegraph pole with the removal of the existing at 14 Davis Street brought about discussion on the need to ensure that there is a policy to obtain as much cabling underground as possible. It was agreed that this should be included as a future policy of the Committee and spelt out in the Development Plan.

Angeline Clarke submitted an application for the siting of a mobile home for use as accommodation for family members at 1 Callaghan Road. This, however, was contrary to Policy H8 which. in part, says that "Applications for new mobile homes in garden areas will normally be refused". Members noted that the unit was not an extra but was being moved from one garden space to another, also that there was no room at the Mobile Home Park on Murray Heights, and resolved to grant temporary planning permission for the development.

Although included on the list of applications for permission to erect a dwelling also a generator shed and to site a water tank on Plots 10 and 12 MPA Road, there were insufficient details available from the applicant. Malcolm Ashworth, so his proposal had to be deferred

The Committee then noted that the Building Adviser. Jim Robison, had approved the issue of Building Permits for eight items of construction, seven of which were included in the previously described developments with the eighth being a partition installed at the Community School to form two classrooms for the FIG.


There was just one Grant Application for off-street parking John Rowland sought this for his property at 19 Jeremy Moore Avenue but, as there was an issue over the land which needed to be resolved at a meeting of Stanley Lands Committee, members agreed it should be delegated to the officers when this had been settled.

Lastly, some Planning Guidance Notes prepared by Antony Lancaster were examined by the Committee. These dealt with the development of residential plots, offstreet parking standards, and development plans. That for residential off-street parking brought about some discussion and it was agreed that, where there was the requirement for at least two parking places. a garage with a space in front would no longer be acceptable and that one space must not be obstructed by a space in use. Side by side parking would in future be the preferred

The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, August 7, again commencing at 9am in the Liberation Room.

General Practice

Brushing your teeth with Dentist Sally owen

BRUSHING properly and regularly will have a major effect on the health of your teeth and gums.

Brushing is simple and easy. It should be part of everyone's daily routine. Teeth should be for life and they can be if you look after them. When you brush your teeth you are trying to remove the plaque which is constantly building up on the tooth surface.

Plaque is the yellow/ cream coloured coating that builds up on the surface of your teeth. It is just a collection of bacteria These bacteria are responsible for causing decay and gum disease so you need to

brush them away. The aim is to establish a lifelong behaviour pattern of cleaning the teeth. Although this article is mainly about children, most of the information applies to children as well. Ideally it is best if parents start brushing their children's teeth before the first baby teeth erupt The first teeth crupt at about 6 months although this is variable. So, at about 4 months start practising by gently brushing their gums. This establishes good habits and a clean mouth for the new teeth to crupt

Brushes and toothpaste

You need to use a small soft brush that will easily reach all the nooks and crannies of the mouth It should be changed about every three months or as soon as it be-comes worn out. This applies to all toothbrushes, not just children's. It is amazing what some people clean their teeth with. If you have any doubts about the type of brush to use ask at the Dental Department or Pharmacy

As well as brushing you need to use a fluoride toothpaste. Virtually all the common toothpastes have fluoride in them. You need to use a small pea size amount of toothpaste It is usual to start with children's toothpastes as they are milder than adults', containing less fluoride.

Also, children often do not like the strong mint flavour. Recent research has questioned whether the fluoride concentration in children's toothpaste is strong enough to be beneficial. So the advice at the moment is to try and move onto adult toothpaste as soon as possible. Fluoride toothpaste makes teeth stronger and more resistant to de-Since its introduction decay rates have dropped dramatically.

You must be wary of using too much toothpaste, especially at an early age, as all the toothpaste is swallowed by a young child. Too much toothpaste results in too much fluoride being swallowed, which can result in fluorosis of the teeth. This can make the teeth brown and mot-

How to brush a child's teeth Some children enjoy having their teeth brushed while with others it is a bit of a battle but parents must perof a battle out parents must per-sist. Sit the child on your knee fac-ing away from you and tilting the head slightly backwards, brush from behind. Try to develop a pattern with cleaning so you do not miss any of the teeth and clean all the tooth surfaces. At the same time have a good look inside to make sure you are cleaning properly and to see if new teeth have erupted, which you will then need to clean. Try to make brushing fun by singing songs or make it into a game.

When to brush

Aim to brush the teeth twice a Usually you should brush after breakfast and then last thing at night. At night is very important time be-cause the saliva flow decreases. This means that your teeth are not as well protected when you are asleep. This is also why it is especially bad to have juice" to drink during the night. You should only drink water during the night. This should be regarded as the golden rule.

Older Children

Everything mentioned about young children applies equally to older children and adults. Usually from the age of 2 children like to help brush their teeth. This is good as they are starting to learn. Children will need help with brushing up to the age of about 7 or 8. They do not have the coordination to brush properly before this age - consider what their writing is like - so it is still the adult or parent's responsibility. Encourage them to spit out the toothpaste and not to swallow.

Try and get your child to establish a pattern to their brushing. Perhaps start at the bottom left then move to the bottom right before going up to the top right and then top left

In addition brush the inside and outside of the teeth as well as the biting surfaces. Give plenty of encouragement and as they get older check that it is being done properly. If there is a problem with remembering to brush make a chart for the children to tick when they have brushed Also make sure the brush is the correct size and not worn out.

To brush their teeth properly they need a mirror so they can see

what they are doing. It is they same as looking in the mirror when you comb your hair.

Use disclosing tablets. They contain a red dye that stains the plaque on your teeth, making it easier to see. You can use them in two ways

1. Brush your teeth then disclose and see what you have missed. Brush

2. Disclose first then brush all the red stained plaque away.

With young children you need to try and clean all the tooth surfaces as best you can.

With young children you need to try and clean all the tooth surfaces as best you can However, from about age 8 your child (and adults) should be shown how to brush by the dentist or hygienist. There is a correct method of brushing that maximises plaque removal. Usually the brushing takes about 2 minutes. which is far longer than you think.
Electric Toothbrushes

Electric toothbrushes are very good but is a personal choice. Some people find they do a better job cleaning with an electric toothbrush. They are also popular with kids and in some cases they encourage brushing. But remember they only clean where you put them! You need to make sure you know or are shown how to use one correctly.

After Brushing

After brushing always spit! When you put toothpaste applying a medicine (fluoride). So once you have brushed spit out the excess toothpaste but do not rinse your mouth out with water So spit don't

Brushing

Finally, without trying to confuse things, when you have something to eat you should really wait for 20 minutes before you brush your When you have something to eat the bacteria in the mouth feed on the sugar in the food and produce acid. This acid then dissolves the very top layer of the tooth. So if you brush straight away you will re-move this loose layer of tooth. If you wait 20 minutes the saliva will have remineralised tooth surface and when you brush you will not be removing tooth

To help there is a wide range of dental products available from the hospital pharmacy.

Remember

1. Brush thoroughly twice a day, every day, with a fluoride toothpaste as soon as the teeth begin to appear in the mouth.

2. Spit - don't rinse.











Wool market report for week ending July 4

GENERAL Overview

Greasy wool prices fell significantly during the first two days of selling, but recovered quite strongly on the third and final day at sales in Australia last week. The entry of Chinese buying activity was put forward as the reason for the last day recovery.

Analysts are very uncertain as to which direction the market will head in the coming weeks. Private buying activity outside of the auction rooms of the world, including demand for Falkland Islands wool, will be very interesting and important to watch over the coming few weeks

Australian Market

Greasy wool prices in Australia fell by around 10 pence per kilogram clean at the finer end of the micron range, but increased by approximately the same amount at the broader end of the market.

It is especially interesting to note the price premium that 22 and 23 micron wool is currently achieving over 19 micron fleece wool.

It is also worthy of note that good style and better strength fleece lots were less affected by the price falls than the poorer quality drought affected lots.

In total 66,890 bales of wool were offered for sale during the week, with just over 48,648 bales purchased by the trade. Pass in rate averaged 27,2%.

Included in the offering were 4,168 bales of crossbred wool, of which 3,475 bales were sold. (pass in rate 16,4%).

Profits are not everything

YOUR front page article of July 4 2003 on the erosion of woman's rights is thought provoking and will no doubt cause some heated debate. However I think that the withdrawal of free spectacles has the potential to have a greater effect on the health of the nation.

I am one of those people who rely on my spectacles and couldn't function without them.

While I can afford my specs. and contact lenses, there must be a lot of people in the community who will have difficulty raising the

The health, and potentially the wealth, of these people will suffer. And it will affect more than two people a year.

What percentage of the population wear spectacles? At a conservative guess it must be over 20%. The net effect of this budgetary fiddling is not to save the Islands any money.

If somebody needs an abortion they will still have it, and if they need new specs they will still have Therefore the money still gets spent from the country's collective purse. The only saving is within the budget of - one - government department, with the consequent transfer of that spending burden to the general public.

Bottom line - the money will still be spent! There are similarities here with the Byron Marine-Tamar-Island Shipping fiasco. FIG saves £5000 from its own budget, but at what harm to the nation's collective purse?

A substantial part of the coastal shipping funding, and Island Shipping's profits (assuming that they are a well run company and will make a profit), is now going to leave the Islands rather then be recycled within the local economy.

Time will tell; but from what little information is made public, on the decision making process, these decisions don't look like good

A giant backward leap by Health Service

I'VE JUST received last week's paper, and have been quite amazed at the giant backward leap which is being made by the Health Service.

As I am still in the UK, and consequently a bit out of touch with what is going on I feel cautious about commenting on the termination discussion. Despite that. a few questions which occur to me immediately are: is money which may be saved by this decision to be fully reinvested in Health Education. (both in the community and schools) which may reduce the incident of unplanned pregnancy?

Has adequate consideration been given to the potential costs incurred when women who wish to terminate a pregnancy are de-nied this right? I would anticipate that considerably more money may be required to fund support services, accomodation and equipment.

Julie Bellhouse's letter made reference to other area's for potential

rationing of health care, and this is something that has been discussed by the NHS in the UK. Does the Health Services comittee see unwanted pregnancy as a lifestyle issue?

If so will funding of other lifestyle related Health Issues be questioned?

How much money is spent treating both minor and serious ill health which is directly attributable to smoking, alcohol use, poor diet (leading to obesity and poor dental health), lack of adequate exercise, excessive exposure to the sun, etc?

Individuals who choose not to use safety equipment such as ear defenders, steel toecapped footwear, hard hats and seatbelts are arguably taking far greater risks than a woman who may become pregnant as a result of a contraceptive failure

Kirchner-Blair meeting coming soon

ARGENTINE president Nestor Kirchner will be leaving Thursday night for London to begin a week long meeting with European leaders in France. Spain and Brussels where he will be meeting EU Executive Committee president Romano Prodi.

In London president Kirchner will be participating in a two day meetings of the Third Way forum. specially invited by Prime Minister Tony Blair.

Other Latinamerican participants in the Labour Party sponsored event are Chilean president Socialist Ricardo Lagos and Brazilian president Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva from the Workers Party.

On Tuesday the Argentine delegation will be travelling to Brussels to meet with Mr Prodi at the Executive office of the European Union.

From Belgium president

Kirchner flies to Paris to interview French president Jacques Chirac and Prime Minister Jean Pierre Raffarin.

The following day is Madrid where President Kirchner will be meeting King Juan Carlos and Spanish president Jose Aznar.

This will be Mr Kirchner's first incursion in Europe since he took office last May 25

The Argentine president must be back by early Friday, July 18 since Mr Kirchner promised relatives and friends of the victims of the terrorist bombing in 1994 of the Jewish Federation building AMIA. in downtown Buenos Aires, he would be present at the anniversary commemoration.

Almost a hundred people were killed and hundreds injured and maimed when a car bomb shattered to rubble the seven floor construction of the Jewish community.

Brazil's President Lula faces first strike

WITH only six months in office Brazilian president and former union leader Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva faces his first national strike following federal government employees' decision to cease activities in protest against the proposed reform to the pension system.

The indefinite work stoppage could bring Brazil to a standstill since it involves from Customs staff and tax collectors to the Federal Police and the whole education system.

The strike was called by the Coordinated Entities of Federal Employees who oppose the pension review proposal, that together with the tax reform are considered by President Lula da Silva as the. ..two main bills to ensure Bra-'s development.'

"We expect 40% of the almost 800,000 federal employees to comply with the strike," said Gilberto Cordeiro Gomes, chairman of the Confederation of Federal Public Service Workers, one of the several unions of the Coordinated Entities.

The proposed reform targets some of the privileges of the federal civil service, including contributions from pensioners with the hope of balancing the almost broke system.

Brazilian federal civil employees can retire at the age of 48 and 53. (women and men), and receive in money a higher pension than their last salary since no contributions are deducted.

Besides, after retirement they can take a second federal job, meaning that at the moment over 20,000 retired federal employees have greater incomes than Mr Lula da Silva himself.

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

Tactical' exit or Chilean partner for loss-making meat company?

DEVELOPMENT Corporation General Manager Julian Morris has recommended a 'tactical withdrawal' from the export market for the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) unless value can be added through a joint venture

The loss-making company was approved government capital expenditure of £420,000 at a combined meeting of the Falkland Islands Development Board and the Standing Finance Committee last Friday.

FIMCo was also approved the new 2003 forecast deficit of £422,000* and the 2004 forecast delicit of £315,000

Although Members expressed serious concerns at the difficul-ties the project continues to face, the majority voted in favour of purchasing the £422,000 cold store needed to bring the abattoir up to European Union specifica-

Other changes needed, but not yet approved, include an autoloader for the incinerator (£50,000) and plant changes to comply with EU legislation (£50,000). A fixed asset expenditure summary over the life of the project totalled £3,846,167

The meeting began with a presentation by Development Corporation General Manager Julian Morris who explained in stark terms that since the project first began, the capital cost has quadrupled, the number of staff has tripled, the frequency of shipping has more than halved and the cost of shipping a northbound reefer is triple the 2003 forecast.

Most of the key factors,

funding cost, legislation, shipping, power, sheep numbers and manning have developed significantly against the project," said

He noted that at the current

wool price a lamb used for wool production was of more value to the farmer (worth about £35 over its lifetime) than it would be to sell it to

The one piece of good news was that with no previous experience the meat for the first season was sold for a reasonable price and had been processed to the highest grade (EU

Mr Morris said that having reviewed over 30 possible scenarios the most likely was to develop a joint venture partnership.

He said, "...exporting in its current mode, given current conditions is not viable, however if 'value' can be added to the current operation, possibly through a joint venture then this could be supported, if not, a tactical withdrawal would seem sen-

Members appeared to support pursuing this scenario involving a company Chilean such Simunovic, despite the caution that this would be, "...difficult, uncertain and risky." Figures presented by Mr Morris showed that in the earliest stages of such a scenario it would still mean only a halving of the losses that would occur under current op-

Mr Morris later told Penguin News, that in the long term, "If shipping links improve, productivity at the abattoir increases to say 90%. sales values harden based on the joint venture proposals currently re-ceived. livestock available to FIMCo improves then FIMCo would be at breakeven.

Asked about his comment in the meeting, that commercially (without a JV) the export market is a. " non starter," he said, "Commercially it currently is a nonstarter, that is, loss making, but then no commercial company would have started the project with the costs and risks involved.

The project is seeking to de-

velop an economic benefit for the farming community and the wider Falklands community. The investment is being made with the intent that the project can be moved forward to achieve this strategic goal in giving farmers an alternative to

This government investment is fairly typical around the world -look at the EU. However, when measuring the relative performance of the project to date, it is important to realise that any organisation. including a commercial company, would have expected to have made significant losses at this early stage (first season) in the development of an enterprise. Frequently people here internalise issues int only happens here', when the issues are common around the globe."

At the meeting, Councillor John Birmingham, and Falkland Islands Company Director Roger Spink opposed the motion to approve

funds for the cold store.

Councillor Birmingham commented later, "The presentation by Mr Morris was one of the most honest and down to earth I have sat through during my time on council. I shall be asking for a repeat of that presentation at a special public meeting.

I consider that the project that I have supported all along has reached a point where the public should be made aware of the future funding that it will require to maintain its EC license. My own view is that the financial benefits of having an EC license are not worth the expense. Others think otherwise, that is their opinion and I respect

He added, "If the Standing Finance Committee agree to spend upwards of £800,000 on the project then it will be difficult to defend cuts in the medical services because of the need to save money

Government loses to Gordon Forbes

THE Falkland Islands Government has lost to Gordon Forbes Construction (Falklands) Ltd. in a Supreme Court case.

A legal application had been made by government claiming that an award made in arbitration proceedings should be set aside as it was procured against public

The evidence had been presented in a four-day hearing in early

In his summing up Senior Magistrate Nick Sanders found in favour of Gordon Forbes (Falklands) Ltd., however he noted that there were few in the case who emerged with any credit.

He criticised the conduct of Gordon Forbes and his advisors, and the Attorney General and other government officers, and the government's legal agents in the UK for various failures during both the negotiations and the legal case it-

The question of costs has been adjourned for the parties to make further representations once they have considered the judgement.

Penguin News will provide a full report on the judgement in next week's edition.

Comment by Managing Editor Lisa Riddell

ISN'T it interesting how a word you hardly ever hear suddenly starts making appearances in every aspect of your life.

In my case the word was coercion; and having heard it applied to at least two different scenarios during last week. I was particularly intrigued to have the opportunity to actually observe the concept in action, in the FIDC Board room that Friday.

Now I am quite sure that Councillor Summers would vigorously dismiss the suggestion that his frosty and dismissive attitude towards those who disagreed with his opinions on the future for the abattoir,

was inappropriately authoritarian.

For after all, a strong Chairman capable of giving confident direction is a useful tool, particularly when members have a tendency to wander off the subject, change sides at a whim or make vague statements that will sit as comfortably on one side of the fence as the other.

But still the question is, should the Chairman really have directed the decision making process quite so zealously in his preferred direction?

Particularly bearing in mind the enormous strength of the argument, and valid concerns of the opposition, who seemed to have paid more attention to the figures than the others had.

It is hardly surprising though that feelings run high in relation to this

potentially catastrophic conundrum.

On the one hand we have group clinging to the honourable but arguably unrealistic philosophy of, `...give the farmers meat production as an alternative income source'; while on the other we have a nation watching with dismay as government pour hundreds of thousands of pounds into a project that is extremely unlikely to ever break even, let alone make a profit.

Yes we want to assist farmers, yes this type of industry takes time

to build, and yes it is complementary to wool growing

But do we really want to build an industry that barely breaks even in the UK ('half a percent net profit for the best performers') let alone in a country with logistic problems such as ours?

You think I'm being too cynical?

Well "... that," as Councillor Summers would say. "is an opinion" (but imagine tone of voice implying it's a pretty pathetic one) and I know there are plenty of respected characters with far more agricultural knowledge than I, who believe the industry has some relative potential.

However, when I enquired of the FIDC General Manager whether there were any circumstances under which this industry could break even he said, "Yes..."

If FOUR factors all come into line.

These comprise, improvements to shipping, productivity, sales value and livestock availability.

Perhaps it could happen, but what are the chances?

Shipping costs are (and I quote) 'a major source of cost and risk'. In fact shipping of the first abattoir export produce tripled the January 2003 forecast.

Secondly, it could take ten years to adequately build up sheep numbers, providing of course that bad weather doesn't add to that time.

And perhaps productivity could be increased, but if other factors don't come into line then increased productivity would actually increase losses.

But despite this it appears we're going to keep trying.

And I suppose I can just about accede that since we've built it we should at least attempt to utilise it.

But if the Chilean Joint Venture fails (the only scenario that might cut losses to an 'acceptable' level) what then?

Will we just keep ploughing on?

Will we have more meetings where members squabble aimlessly, and then agree to throw funds needed for essential services into a great big useless hole simply so that a few councillors can save face.

AI in thirteen locations

A SUMMARY of progress to date of the artificial insemination/embryo transfer programme was given to the Falkland Islands Development Board by Director of Agriculture Peter Johnston on Wednes-

The program, which lasted from May 31 to June 14, was carried out in thirteen different locations across the Islands, with 1633 sheep being inseminated and 287 sheep receiving embryos.

Staff from the Department of Agriculture were also trained to carry out a further 430 procedures. however only 267 of these were successful due to poor ram management leading to high pregnancy

Other problems encountered by the programme include some sheep's failure to cycle and the large number of sites the staff involved had to cover over the 14 days.

This, according to Mr Johnston. put unnecessary pressure on the team.

"The number of locations for

next year's programme will preferably be reduced to one or two locations.

A manufacturing fault also meant that not as many Cormo breed embryos could be implanted as planned, and the Department is pursuing a full refund from the sup-

Mr Johnston commented, The Department has discussed with all farms involved methods that will be implemented in the Falkland Islands over the next few years to maximise productivity and profitability gains from this AI/ET programme.

"The Department has commenced planning for a fresh semen Al training programme for farmers and is exploring embryo transfer opportunities with the Islands '

He added we clearly recognise that this programme, and hopefully others that will follow, is vital to ensure that flexibility of breed choice and access to the world's best genetic material is available to all farmers in the Falkland Islands.

Teens team up for health issues

THE teen health forum and water supplies in camp were both discussed at a meeting of the Health and Medical Services Committee on Tuesday.

Dr Roger Diggle confirmed that under Health of the Nation issues, the Teen Health Forum met on July 9 to discuss

- Access to information.
- Youth facilities in the Islands,
- · Health Services and social support services for young people.

Dr Diggle said their next meeting would take place on July 23 and the Secretary had confirmed to him that they would soon be in a position to produce a report on everything discussed so far.

Under Board of Health Dr Diggle also explained that some water supplies in camp had been tested and while, "...one settlement was better, the other had experienced little change."

He said the Public Works Department had advised the persons involved how to filter water, ". to kill bugs," using an ultra violet lamp placed at the point where the water enters the house.

Another major issue involved support for the abattoir so that health measures would be in place that would suit European Union inspectors

Dr. Diggle added it was likely a food inspector would visit the Islands on alternate years.

Velma Malcolm raised the question of why the pharmacy had had to purchase tubs of aspirin from the FIC West Store.

Director of Health and Medical Services Norman McGregor Edwards said this had been in response to a potential shortfall in supplies.

He added. "In the end all of the items were not required."

FIA condolences to Baroness Thatcher

ON behalf of members of the Falkland Islands Association, the Chairman. Sir Rex Hunt, has sent a message of condolence to Baroness Thatcher on the death of her husband.

Sir Rex wrote: "I send you our most sympathetic feelings on the death of Sir Denis.

"We shall always remember him for the unwavering support he gave you during the Falklands War in 1982.

" For those of us who were for-

tunate to have met him, we shall also remember him as the perfect gentleman, whose company we always enjoyed."

Sir Rex signed off his letter with "...most sincere condolences and warmest regards."

Lady Thatcher recently became the first and only Patron of the Falkland Islands Association, having expressed her wish to be associated with the organisation during last year's ceremonies marking the twentieth anniversary of the war-

Argentina protests Falklands fishery licensing

DIRECTOR of Fisheries Dr. John Barton this week emphatically refuted claims by the Argentine President that the Falkland Islands is destroying the fishing grounds in the South West Atlantic.

Argentine President Néstor Kirchner (right) raised a number of issues regarding the Falkland Islands when he met with the British Prime Minister on Sunday,

President Kirchner told Mr Blair he intends to continue pursuing claims for sovereignty over the Falkland Islands. He also expressed concern over the large number of fishing permits the Falklands Government issues to third countries. which he said represents important economic losses for Argentina

According to Agencia DyN, the brief meeting between Kirchner and Blair took place following a Progressive Governance Conference meeting in London on July 13

When he touched on the Falklands fishing issue. Kirchner said the region was experiencing excessive economic growth and Falkland Islanders were destroying the fishing ground.

Director of Fisheries in the Falklands, Dr John Barton, responded to the allegation saying, "Catches in Argentina in recent years have far surpassed Falkland catches. The issue is really one of total catches or total effort directed at Illex. The fact that Argentine catches may be taken by Argentine flagged vessels does not make the squid any less dead.

Conservation agreements in respect of Argentine and Falkland arcas have been working reasonably well. The long term sustainability of Illex requires that conservation measures also extend to the high seas. This is an issue which has been flagged up in joint statements between the UK and Argentina. It is something which the Falklands has been pushing for, but progress has been slow.

The Argentine government says the fishing permits the Falklands issues for Japan. Korea and Taiwan represent losses of USD\$100



million a year for Argentina, reports Agencia EFE.

Mr Barton commented, "In the past we have been concerned about the low price of Argentine Illex licences. In terms of licence fee per tonne of catch, Argentine fees have some times been about 50% of Falkland fees.

The last fishing agreement between Great Britain and Argentina was signed on July 4 in London, at the 23rd annual meeting of the South Atlantic Fisheries Commission. Both nations defended their position although they both agreed on the importance of the South Atlantic fishery resources and pledged to take joint measures to monitor and control factory vessels more

Sovereignty

The British Government has reiterated that there is no question of any change in British policy on Falkland Islands sovereignty.

It was responding to reports in the Argentine press of the July 13 meeting, saying President Kirchner raised the issue of Falklands sovereignty

Mr Blair listened politely but insisted there is no intention of changing Britain's commitment of support for the Islanders and their

Questioned by Mercopress. both the Prime Minister's Office and the Foreign and Commonwealth Office played down the Argentine press reports, saying that the international conference of Centre-Left parties for which President Kirchner had been invited to the United Kingdom was not the kind of forum in which Falklands sovereignty and its fishing industry could be discussed in any meaningful way. MP/PN

Health committee apology follows complaint over secrecy

THE Health and Social Services Committee (HMSC) has apologised for omitting to give a reason for excluding press and public from an item under the closed part of their meeting on Tuesday.

The apology was in response to a complaint that under current legislation, before a decision can be made to include a subject as exempt. the committee as a whole has to pass a resolution at the meeting to exclude the public and has to give reasons for this decision in open session.

General Purposes Committee Chair Norma Edwards said, "At the end of Part 1 the Chair said that she moved that the press and public be excluded... There was no dissent so the motion was taken as accepted.

She added, "It seems that the requirements to give the reason for

exclusion of the press and public has been inadvertently omitted from meetings of the HMSC for some time and it will now be ensured that it is reinstated with immediate effect. They apologised that this occurred.

The open section of the meeting was attended by a representative of newly formed woman's action group 'Actively Women'

A spokesperson for the group said, "Later on the radio HMSC gave the reason for keeping the item in question a secret as 'part of the discussion could well have led to the identification of individual pa-

"This was misleading. Apart from having serious concerns about protection of identity of patients from the Members themselves, the primary point is that the item was not about a specific case it was about hospital policy. It was listed on the agenda as 'withdrawal of flights for terminations

Therefore the only reason it was made a secret was on the offchance that somebody would inadvertently started talking about something sensitive. This is not a good enough reason to exclude the public, because it could be applied to absolutely any item on any committee meeting agenda at any time. If something is in open session it is up to the Chair to keep a check that personal and commercial information is not discussed.

"This overuse of the practice of making items exempt gives the impression that committees are using it to protect them from public scrutiny, rather than for its real purpose of protecting personal information or commercially sensi-

tive contracts.

"The government memorandum circulated earlier this month was a good start in terms of government showing willing to make information more accessible to public, but I feel they have a long way to go yet before they are really offering the true meaning of 'open govern-

The memorandum she referred to was entitled 'Access to Government Information' and advised committee organisers and secretaries to forward all Part II agendas, papers and minutes, in addition to Part I, to the Government Secretary's personal assistant.

This is so that minutes can be monitored and 'will ensure consistency between committees and that members of the public are being given the correct access to the information discussed by the com-

mittees.

Tactical withdrawal or JV? Continued from front

Mr Spink said, "On the basis of the projections given to the Develop-ment Board I felt I could not support the investment of a further £420,000 of government funds for the cold store and £300,000 in operating subsidy in a project that is highly unlikely to make a positive contribution to the Islands or the farming community

The international market that the abattoir will have to operate in is outside of our control and facilities in the United Kingdom are closing due to the poor returns avail-

"Given Government budget constraints I felt the money should have been saved and would then have been available to invest in a project with a greater chance of a long term benefit to the Falklands community or could be used to gain export certification for the abattoir in the future if world economic conditions for this type of commodity improved.

However, others in the meeting appeared largely supportive of Councillor Mike Summers' view that the project had been put in place of farming subsidies, and that the setting up of an entire industry took time and investment.

Director of Agriculture Peter Johnston commented that a meat industry was the most complementary to a woolgrowing industry and noted that a small group of farmers were keen to invest in their farms in terms of developing quantity and quality of produce.

*This was originally forecast at £171,000 in January SFC, however Mr Morris noted that it was based on assumption based forecasting and now that the first season is over they can move to reality based fore-

Passport problems for travellers to US?

FORTHCOMING changes in the United States Visa Waiver Programme will affect holders of nonmachine-readable passports and the children included in parents' or siblings' passports.

The United States Government has announced that, with effect from October 1, all citizens of countries eligible for the US Visa Waiver Program (VWP) wishing to enter the USA without a visa must present a machine-readable passport (MRP). VWP nationals who do not have MRPs will need to obtain a US nonimmigrant visa.

This policy also means that children who are at present included in their parents' or siblings' passport (whether machine-readable or not) will need to have their own separate passport in order to be admitted to the USA.

This is because the machine-read-

able strip contains details only of the principal holder, and not of included children.

A spokesperson for Customs and Immigration Department in the Falklands said, "Regretably, British passport facilities offered by the Customs and Immigration Department in the Falkland Islands are not of the machine-readable type

However, the Falkland Islands Government in conjunction with the Foreign and Commonwealth Office are looking for ways to facilitate the issue of machine-readable passports to British citizens in the Islands.

In the meantime, British citizens travelling to USA holding nonmachine readable passports must either obtain a US Non-immigrant Visa prior to arrival or change to a machine-readable passport whilst abroad." For more detail contact the Customs and Immigration Dept.

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Your questions answered

IN WHAT circumstances is the morning after pill available in the Falkland Islands?

the Falkland Islands?
Why is the abortion

Why is surgical abortion not available in the Falkland Islands?

Our thanks to Dr Roger Diggle for the following response.

The morning after pill is available. Women need to contact the KEMH as soon as reasonably practical after unprotected intercourse or a contraceptive failure.

The practice nurse, the A&E nurses and some of the ward nurses are able to issue the morning after pill following a strict protocol. Any women who don't fit into the protocol would be referred to a doctor. Obviously, the woman can see a doctor if they prefer.

There is clear evidence to show that the sooner after the event the pill is taken, the more effective it is. So, it is ok to come at the beginning of the next day (it isn't necessary to obtain the pill in the middle of the night normally).

In the UK, it is possible to buy the morning after pill from a pharmacy but we feel that isn't necessary here. An intrauterine device can also be used for this purpose

We have discussed the abortion pill with our visiting gynaecologist, who strongly advises we do not use it here. There is a significant proportion of women in whom the abortion pill either doesn't work at all or only partially.

Then the woman needs an operation to do a suction termination of pregnancy. This has a number of risks associated with it. In the worst case it is possible for the uterus (womb) to be ruptured which is potentially life threatening. There is also a significant risk of causing permanent damage to the cervix which would lead to recurrent miscarriages in the future and there is a risk of pelvic inflammatory disease leading to permanent infertility.

There is good medical evidence to show that the more of these procedures one undertakes, the lower the incidence of problems, simply because the doctor maintains their skills.

In a life-threatening or emergency situation, obviously one of the doctors or the surgeon would undertake this kind of procedure (in fact about 6 - 10 a year are done here), but in this situation the risks are outweighed by the benefit.

In the case of a termination of pregnancy which is not being done because of life threatening risk to the mother, the risks very definitely outweigh the benefit and therefore the woman should have the procedure done by an expert.

I am not exactly sure what the situation is on St Helena for instance, but the geographical isolation means that it is inevitable that in certain circumstances higher risks are acceptable as there is no other choice (if one has to wait 6 weeks for the ship).

Court reports

Navy man jailed after drunken drive to Stanley

A CREWMEMBER of HMS Leeds Castle who took a drunken drive into Stanley in a vehicle which was not his, was sent to prison on Monday.

John Bowen pleaded guilty to taking a vehicle without the owner's consent, driving under the influence of alcohol, driving without a valid driving licence and driving without insurance. Michael Henson, the passenger in the vehicle, was charged with allowing to be carried in a stolen vehicle.

Prosecutor Graham Cripps told the court that on the evening of the July 12 both men had been drinking heavily in the MPA complex.

Fearing they had missed their transport to Mare Harbour, they took a Land Rover that was parked outside the complex with the intention of travelling to Mare Harbour, but decided to drive into Stanley instead.

In Stanley, the two men were witnessed driving erratically along Villiers Street in the stolen Land Rover by a police vehicle, and when chased they sped off along Ross Road.

The Land Rover eventually slowed and came to a sudden stop on the corner of Philomel Hill, causing the police vehicle to collide with it

The passenger of the Land Rover (Mr Henson) opened his door and ran away, but was later found by police officers hiding behind a skip.

Both men were arrested and taken to the police station where Mr Bowen was breathalysed, giving a reading of 78 mg of alcohol per 100ml of breath. The legal limit is 35mg.

Speaking on behalf of the two defendants, Lieutenant Reynolds said that both men were exemplary crewmembers of HMS Leeds Castle and both deeply regretted their actions

The Senior Magistrate fined Mr Henson £800 plus £70 prosecution costs, as well as endorsing his licence. He told Mr Henson that he, "...was aware of what was going on and had ample opportunity to affect the outcome, and yet you went along with it"

For unlawfully taking a vehicle and driving under the influence of alcohol Mr Bowen was sentenced to three months imprisonment and disqualified from driving in the Islands for two years.

Addressing Mr Bowen, Mr Sanders commented. "The message is obviously not getting through to MPA about the seriousness of taking vehicles while drunk, therefore a stern example needs to be made."

Trio's 'drunken, oafish' behaviour leads to pub ban

THREE Stanley men appeared before the Senior Magistrate on Monday for sentencing, following their guilty pleas to offences of common assault and threatening behaviour.

Prosecutor Ros Cheek told the court that Owen Betts, Ian Betts and Wayne Clasen became involved in a series of incidents at the Globe Tavern on the evening of May 28.

Mr Clasen was seen to become

Mr Clasen was seen to become agitated after receiving verbal abuse from a man and as a fight broke out, Ian Betts became involved, assaulting a third party.

As bar staff attempted to restrain lan Betts, Owen Betts also became involved, assaulting two of the staff.

The incident ended promptly as all three men were eventually escorted from the premises by friends and staff.

Defence lawyer, Rory Gilchrist, said that the incident was out of character for the men who all regretted their actions.

Both Ian Betts and Wayne Clasen were ordered to carry out 140 hours of community service and pay £70 prosecution costs.

They were also issued with six month exclusion orders from all premises with an on-licence.

Owen Betts was ordered to carry out 200 hours of community service and pay prosecution costs of £70. He also received a 12 month exclusion order.

In issuing the sentences. Senior Magistrate Nick Sanders said, "People should expect to go into public houses in Stanley without encountering this drunken, oafish behaviour."

brought before the court on Wednesday morning. Zhanna Shcherbich pleaded

Zhanna Shcherbich pleaded guilty to driving at 39 miles per hour in Stanley and Jonathan Butler, whose speed was measured at 36 miles per hour also pleaded guilty. The speed limit is 25 miles per hour.



Mr Kiddle, who had previously pleaded guilty to stealing £40 from a man living in his accommodation block, was ordered to pay £40 compensation and £70 prosecution costs.

Mr Sanders also issued Mr Kiddle with a probation order lasting 12 months.

Time to find new racecourse site

We note the concerns of the Sports Association members as reported in *Penguin News* dated 4/7/2003 over the racecourse lease.

In 1991 this lease was negotiated between our Company and the Chairman of the association at the time Mr Laurie Butler. Decision on moral grounds? Have the courage to say so

THE most shocking part of the current abortion flight debate is not FIG's decision to cease paying for flights except where a termination is 'a medical necessity', but the revclation that FIG does not assist with the cost of the operation nor the woman's living expenses. Why not?

Even before this latest decision. women's access to abortion was thus dependent on their financial circumstances. The woman who cannot afford an abortion will face an extreme struggle to meet the cost of raising a child. KEMH staff will be able to judge from their files the range of circumstances in which women who want an abortion find themselves. The public can only speculate. However, it is certain that a young single woman of limited income and no savings will find it far harder to raise the money than an older woman with a well paid job and money in the bank. The teenager who has rarely if ever left the Falkland Islands is also likely to be far more daunted by the prospect of travelling to the UK for medical treatment

The FIBS debate was interesting, but the argument that this decision was made on financial grounds is wholly unconvincing, having regard to the sums involved and the opinions expressed by Councillors (John Birmingham "Many people in this community say abortion should not be allowed." Jan Cheek "Women have a responsibility to adopt a belt and braces approach to contraception if they cannot afford the risk of a pregnancy.")

It is concerning that the official line from the Director of Health and Social Services is that FIG will not fund abortion flights (except in cases of 'medical necessity') yet during the FIBS debate Councillor Birmingham indicated that it is up to the woman to put forward a case as to why FIG should pay for her abortion and associated costs. Why is there a divergence of views on such an important issue?

It is wholly inappropriate for decisions about women's reproductive health to be made on a case-bycase basis. Who is capable of judging whether any woman "deserves" assistance? Whatever the views of individuals or indeed society as a whole in relation to abortion, there must be no place for subjective judgements. FIG must have a clear and stated policy. If funding is to be available in certain circumstances, the criteria for funding must be open to public scrutiny and debate.

The Director of Health and Social Services indicated that if FIG had decided to continue funding abortion flights, then other flights for medical treatment would suffer. Why must this be so? If the Medical Department is required to cut back its total costs by a further £2,000 per annum, there is no reason why that saving must be found from the flights vote rather than, for example, the drugs or dentistry budgets

Budget cuts inevitably require unpleasant choices, but wherever possible cuts should impact across all sectors of the community. One small group - in this instance women of child-bearing age who suffer the trauma of an unwanted pregnancy should not be targeted in this way.

Arguably on budget terms alone this is a short-sighted decision, as the total price of an abortion (operation, flight, living expenses) is unlikely to cost as much as an ordinary pregnancy and delivery, let alone the cost to the state of helping raise the child (medical treatment, health visitor provision, inoculations, education)

Child benefit would meet the estimated £2,000 required to fund an abortion in under four years. And if it is reasonable to assume that the mother of a child who has been forced on her because of the unaccessibility of an abortion is more likely to require social work intervention, then the costs to the state of that child rise even more dramatically.

If officers and/or Councillors have decided to limit women's access to the full range of reproductive health services on financial grounds, they have made a gross miscalculation. If they have made the decision on moral grounds, they should have the courage to say so directly.

Vast majority of abortions for 'social convenience'

to the Penguin News about the arguments surrounding funding for flights for abortions but, after the FIBS debate, I feel a few points do need to be made

Perhaps the first thing to make clear is that personally I am in favour of abortion, but not abortion on demand

I greatly resent the comments made by Lisa and others, both in the Penguin News and on FIBS, that we in the Medical Department have no respect for Human Rights.

The Medical Department has a well-deserved reputation for fighting for peoples Human Rights.

Where was the Penguin News campaign in support of the Medical Department when we were facing disciplinary action for publicising the ongoing abuse suffered by foreign fishermen in our waters?

Much emphasis has been placed on the belief that to ask a lady to fund her own flight is an infringement of her Human Rights. I dispute this and feel it is about time we all stopped skirting around the issue of abortion and actually looked at the

Abortion here is governed by the same law as applies in England. namely the Abortion Act 1967 as amended by the Human Fertilisation and Embryology Act 1990.

This states that a registered medical practitioner may lawfully terminate a pregnancy if two registered medical practitioners are of the opinion, formed in good faith:

a) that the pregnancy has not exceeded 24 weeks and that the continuance of the pregnancy would involve risk, greater than if the pregnancy were terminated, of injury to the physical or mental health of the pregnant woman or any existing children of her family or

that the termination is necessary to prevent grave permanent injury to the physical or mental health of the pregnant woman: or

that the continuance of the pregnancy would involve risk to the life of the pregnant woman. greater than if the pregnancy were terminated :or

that there is a substantial

would suffer from such physical or mental abnormalities as to be seriously handicapped.

Very late abortions are carried out but only for very severe medical

Most terminations are carried out before 12 weeks using section (c)

However, after 13 weeks that statistical difference is less clear and for this reasons many centres are no longer carrying out 'routine' abortions after 13 weeks.

It could be argued that this law is an infringement of a woman's Human Rights as it denies her the right to an abortion whenever and why ever she wishes.

The alternative to some form of restriction would be to allow abortion on demand, irrespective of the stage of the pregnancy.

I cannot believe that Lisa and her supporters are advocating that a woman should have the right to terminate an otherwise healthy baby right up to the time of delivery; so they accept restrictions must apply.

The law never intended for there to be abortion on demand, that is why it specifies the above conditions and ensures that a woman be seen by two doctors, both of whom must be convinced that she is making the correct decision.

Doctors are often accused of playing God if we refuse an abortion but it is the law that has put us in this difficult position.

Indeed, the British Medical Associations Ethics Dept. advises doctors that when faced with a lady requesting an abortion. "...they must balance a respect for human life with the potential impact of the preg-nancy and birth on the woman's physical and mental health and the well-being of existing siblings.

My 22 years as a doctor also tells me that the number of women requesting an abortion for purely medical reasons i.e. that continuing with the pregnancy is a health risk to the mother and/or child, is very small.

The vast majority of abortions requested here or in the UK are for social convenience



THERE are no better ambassadors for the Falklands, its natural beauty and wildlife than David and Morlene Rabbitts.

After the success of their first video, A Country Lad in the South Atlantic, which sold well both in the Islands and the UK, David and wife Morlene paid a return visit in November and December last year for five weeks.

That extended stay and their love for the islands have resulted in a second excellent video, A Country Lad Returns, which extols the many virtues attracting more and more visitors.


When the couple, from the tiny village of Cotherstone near Barnard Castle in County Durham, are not running their guest house they cannot think of anywhere in the world they would rather be than meeting friends in Stanley or Camp and soaking in the unique atmosphere around them.

It is their affection for the people, wildlife and habitat of the Falklands which shines through in this latest offering. This is no amateur film-maker at work; David's touch is as professional as any television producer. despite the occasional sound quality problem when the wind is howling.

David is the main cameraman and his knowledge of the islands and its people - gained over many visits - enables him to get to grips with the real Falklands. The end result is a 61 minute film which captures the peace and tranquillity of Camp while recognising the daily fight for survival.

It comes as something of a shock when halfway through he captures on film an attempt by a whale to first stalk and then grab sea lion pups. The hungry whale's battle against a receding tide while the pups, oblivious to his presence, play only a few yards away is gripping. I won't spoil the outcome for you.

David and Morlene don't pull



any punches when it comes to describing their horror at finding so many dead or dying gentoos and magallanics on the beaches last year and the empty rocks when the breeding season should have been in full flow. David's sad commentary adds to their dismay.

Thankfully there was much for them to delight in and the beautifully filmed flora and bird life shows the variety of colours all around any resident or visitor who cares to stop and take in either the terrain or the late night summer skyline.

A few locals make a fleeting appearance, but this film is not about people, despite the tremendous hospitality David and Morlene received during their stay.

The Rabbitts acknowledge the help they received from the Stewart family in Stanley, the Chaters on New Island. Rob. Auntie and Ken on Carcass and our 'Falkland family,' the Pole-Evans family, on Saunders.

The only time it comes close to revealing what life is really like in Camp is when David films a gather and sheep drive on Saunders.

There is also a small section which tells the story of the early

missionaries and the appointment of the first Bishop of the Falklands.

For me the video is best summed up in David's own words: "The spectacular natural beauty of the Falklands and its wildlife will always enchant me, but equally so will the sheep farmer who strives daily in an often harsh environment. The world of predator and prey is nearly always a finely balanced one."

This video also has balance. It is well researched, beautifully filmed and should be bought by anyone who has ever visited or is likely to visit the Falkland Islands.

At the moment it can only be purchased direct from David and Morlene at the price of £12.99 with £1.75 to be added for postage except when bought by Islanders. Their address is Glendale, Cotherstone, Barnard Castle, County Durham DL12 9UH.

Failing that you could do worse than visit them and stay at their guest house.

What's happening in the Health Service?

A BREAK from purely clinical matters this week, and an opportunity for a quick round up of projects with which the Health Service is involved at the moment.

The first of these is the Care of the Elderly Ward, also known as the Nursing Home Project, and as people will be aware this has reached an advanced stage of planning. At the moment we are waiting for the detailed costings for the project which we can then discuss with our PWD colleagues.

This is a very complicated project as it involves some major work on specialist areas such as the medical gas supplies, fire alarm and major electrical supplies around the hospital. All of these have to be disconnected and rerouted without disrupting the rest of the hospital. This project has been on discussed for many years and it is really encouraging that it is now so advanced.

A similar project which has been on spoken of for many years is the provision of more units of sheltered housing. Readers will remember that the siting of this sheltered housing was widely debated before the final decision on a site, that between Lois Cottage and Stanley Cottage.

Again, the plans are well advanced; we await costings for the project and are encouraged that we are now close to seeing the end on this long awaited project. At the same time, when Executive Council selected the Lois Cottage/Stanley Cottage site, they also gave us a clear indication that the next phase of sheltered housing should be in the area of the East Stanley development.

We hope to be having preliminary discussions on possible sites within the next few months but this project is at a very early stage and so it is likely to be quite some time before we see any buildings.

A little known project is that of moving the Medical Laboratory from its present location in the small building to the East of the Hospital into more spacious accommodation on the first floor of the Hospital.

For many years now the Laboratory has been very cramped, which has limited the equipment which could be used and the range of tests that we could undertake. It was also an increasingly difficult place for staff to work.

In the last year we have seen a very significant increase in the amount of work that the Laboratory is required to undertake, particularly in medical tests and tests related to Public Health – such things as food preparation, abattoir, water supplies and so on. At the same time we needed to improve and update equipment but lacked the space to do so. This all meant that continued use of the present laboratory was impossible.

Over the last few months, a dedicated team has converted the former engineering offices, library and some of the single accommodation into a Biochemistry Laboratory. Over the next few months, the remaining single accommodation rooms will be converted into Microbiology and Public Health Laboratory spaces. We are also able to install new equipment for which we previously had no space.

All of this has, of course, meant that we have had to relocate the engineering offices – to the old laboratory area, the library – to the seminar room area, and the single accommodation – to 37 Callaghan Road.

On a completely different tack, in early November of this year we are planning to exercise our Major Accident Plan in conjunction with our colleagues at MPA.

This will enable us to practice our plans for dealing with major accidents involving 50 or more casualties and will mean that for 24 hours or so we will not be providing routine appointments. We will still provide a full emergency service, of course.

It is important that we practice and learn how to deal with Major Accidents and this is a really valuable opportunity for us to do so. The exercise will not only involve KEMH but also members of the

community who provide us with support in the event of a Major Accident. We will release further details nearer the time.

I also thought it might an idea to give our readers some idea of the costs associated with medical equipment, because they can be surprising.

For example, – a dental unit (the drill, light, spittoon and hydraulic chair) costs about £35,000.00, and the two electric cautery machines which are used for sealing blood vessels during surgical operations cost about £18,000.00 each.

The reason for such high costs is, of course, that they have to be engineered to very high standards indeed and have numerous built in safety devices because they are being used to treat human beings so the specification of medical equipment is very high.

Finally, it is not just equipment that has to be of a high standard but also the procedures that we follow.

I mentioned, above, the medical gases (such as oxygen) which are piped through the hospital. This and such areas as theatre procedures, emergency power supplies and the maintenance of medical equipment are absolutely vital to human life and are collectively known as Critical Systems.

There are fifteen Critical Systems in the KEMH and each of them has to be covered by a very detailed plan outlining exactly how they are supposed to work and how the maintenance procedures operate.

Drawing up these critical systems plans is a complicated process and we are about to start the second phase of rewrites of these plans to ensure that KEMH continues to offer the highest standard of care that we can.

As always, my colleagues and I are more than happy to talk to anybody about developments within KEMH and to receive comments and suggestions.

South American news provided by

Mercosur meeting in England

THE three Latinamerican presidents participating in the Progressive Governance conference taking place in Bagshot, south England, called for an "extraordinary meeting" of Mercosur members to improve South American integration and advance in physical infrastructure projects.

Presidents Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva (Brazil), Nestor Kirchner (Argentina) and Ricardo Lagos (Chile) held an early Monday morning trilateral meeting in Surrey with the purpose of finding ways, "...to strengthen and expand Mercosur," turning it into a solid block to enable negotiations with the United States and the European Union.

"We recognize it's a historical moment and we want to advance with concrete achievements towards a greater integration. We must become a plural and integrated voice in world affairs." said President Kirchner.

Together with eleven other progressive world leaders who have an affinity for Britain's ruling Labour Party Third Way initiative, the three Latinamerican presidents participated in the two days conference sponsored by British Labour, with Prime Minister Tony Blair as the main star of the event.

"We're going to convene an extraordinary meeting of Mercosur to discuss specific actions for the whole of South America, particularly physical integration infrastructure projects," indicated Chilean President Lagos during a press conference after the regional summit

Mercosur currently has four full members. Argentina, Brazil. Paraguay and Uruguay. two associate members, Bolivia and Chile. and several others (Peru and Venezuela) wishing incorporation

The expansion of Mercosur and closer South American integration is an initiative launched by Brazilian president Lula da Silva with full support of his Argentine counterpart Mr. Kirchner, both of whom want to build a strong capacity for vis-å-vis negotiations with the US and the EU.

It was also agreed that the agenda of infrastructure projects and practical integration measures should be ready for proposal in no more than sixty days possibly in coincidence with the coming technical meeting of the Andean Development Corporation next August.

As to the financing of the ambitious infrastructure projects, partly will come from the same region and the rest from a multilateral institution (not related to the IMF or the World Bank considered obsolete) to be created and funded by the rich countries of the world.

During his address to the Progressive Governance conference President Lula da Silva stated he was not asking for money, but rather multilateral agreements that help with infrastructure and technology projects.

"Last century rich countries managed to globalize their economies and social policies, it's time rich and poor nations discuss how to distribute wealth." indicated Mr Lula da Sīlva who also pointed out that technology has advanced living and quality of life standards, "...but that is also destroying the planet."

Finally the three presidents agreed on a common position for the second World Trade Organization to be held next September in Cancún, Mexico.

Chilean hog farm with dioxin located

CHILE'S Agriculture and Livestock Service (SAG) has managed to locate the hog farm from where pork meat confiscated in Southern Korea originated.

Last week South Korean sanitary authorities detected, and confiscated. Chilean pork with excessive dioxin level (50% above the 5 pictograms per gram authorized by international standards) and immediately notified their counterparts in Chile.

However, according to Chilean authorities given the traceability system applied in the country the only hog farm involved was rapidly detected, and all the meat in the abattoir that processed it withheld for further examination.

SAG officials indicated that the farm has been isolated and a team

of experts is looking for the possible dioxin contamination causes. Water has been cleared since it's pumped from deep underground and is stored in elevated deposits. Besides water samples proved negative.

Chilean authorities have decided that meat and fat samples be analyzed both in local and international laboratories to determine with precision the origin of the di-

SAG also pointed out that South Korea "isolated the only batch of pork rejected" and temporarily suspended imports from the abattoir that processed the contaminated hogs.

The official SAG release does not indicate the number of hogs involved or the location of the farm.

Kirchner links decadence to IMF

ARGENTINE president Nestor Kirchner linked multilateral organizations such as the International Monetary Fund. IMF, with Argentina's decadence, but also pointed out that the country is now in the "reconstruction path" and the "recovery of international trust."

Mr Kirchner, addressing the other thirteen world leaders who participated in the British Labour Party sponsored Reformist Summit of Progressive Governance Conference in Bagshot, Surrey, highlighted that, "...international organizations were very much involved," with the "decadence period" of Argentina recalling that they "proudly showed" former President Carlos Menem to the world, "...as an example of successful economic policies."

However, the Argentine president stressed to the progressive conference that the country is now in the path of recovering. "...export and import volumes, reducing poverty and indigence, and rebuilding institutionally."

Further on Mr Kirchner assured that Argentina will overcome the default situation but warned that this will be achieved on the."... basis of a sustainable program." adding that the region has the historic opportunity of developing full integration of Latinamerica and association with the European Union on equal terms

President Kirchner answering a specific question said that Argen-

tina has, "...definitively abandoned the controlled monetary policies of the nineties," and now adheres to a "free floating currency" plus promoting exports based on a strong domestic market.

During his presentation Mr. Kirchner made it a point, (as promised) to msist in requesting the resumption of sovereignty and fisheries licensing talks with the United Kingdom regarding the Falkland Islands.

"The systematic awarding of fishing licences to third parties in the South Atlantic has made Islanders immensely rich." remarked Mr Kirchner, who apparently expressed similar arguments to British Primer Minister and host of the reformist summit, Tony Blair during their private meeting on Sunday evening.

Earlier in the afternoon the Argentine president had a private meeting with German Chancellor Gerard Schroeder who offered, "in the event of difficulties" to talk with IMF Director General and German bom Horst Köhler. Argentina and the IMF still have to hammer out a long term financial support agreement since next August the current short term understanding finalizes.

Mr Blair during his private meeting on Sunday with Mr Kirchner also promised to help with the recovery of the Argentine economy

Brazil's negative cost of living

COST of living in Brazil was negative for the first time in four and a half years. According to the Brazilian Geography and Statistics Institute. IBGE, consumer prices in Brazil last June dropped 0.15% after having increased 0.61% in May.

Deflation raised hopes that the basic interest rate, currently at 26%, could be reduced when the Central Bank Monetary Policy Committee meets next July 22/23.

The drop surprised market analysts who said, "...deflation was greater than expected. Deflation at retail level Brazil is very rare, but it's the result of the tight monetary policy of the Central Bank."

The IBGE release indicates that the drop in fuel and food prices helped deflation plus the appreciation of the Brazilian currency that now stands in the range of 2.80 reales to the US dollar after having reached 3.80 eight months ago.

Gasoline prices actually dropped 4.94% and food 0.34%.

However in the first six months of 2003 inflation reached 6.64% well above the 2.94% of the same period a year ago. In the last twelve months to June, inflation reached 16.57%

Current interest rates in Brazil are amongst the highest in the world but the Lula da Silva administration has doggedly insisted the "hard medicine" is needed to cool prices even when the economy is almost that

President Lula da Silva and his Finance Minister Antonio Palocci have come under serious criticism for supporting such a tight monetary policy that threatens to force the economy into recession.

However Sao Paulo market analysts believe there's margin for optimism since Mr. Palocci during a recent congressional hearing anticipated that the basic interest rate or Selic, as it's known in Brazil could drop just below 20% by the end of the year.

Falklands Coroner to investigate death of BAS scientist killed by leopard seal

THE death of Kirsty Brown, the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) scientist killed in the freezing Antarctic sea by a leopard seal, is to be investigated by Coroner for the British Antarctic Territories, the Falklands Coroner, Nick Sanders.

Mr Sanders confirmed yesterday that he is likely to travel to Rothera later next week, or as soon after that as can be arranged.

He commented. "The post mortem will take place in the Falkland Islands, but I will need to travel to Rothera and speak to witnesses so I can investigate thoroughly. The likelihood is that the investigation will open in Rothera and reconvene in the Falkland Islands."

Kirsty Margot Brown (28) was attacked without warning by a leopard seal while she was snorkelling at her study site in the bay adjacent to the station.

She was with her snorkelling buddy' when the seal pulled her underwater and contact with her was lost

The two-person shore-cover team saw the incident and a rescue boat was launched immediately in an attempt to save her.

Her colleagues were able to pull her from the water and begin resuscitation procedures in the boat whilst transferring her to the research station

Despite carrying out cardiop-

ulmonary resuscitation (CPR) for one hour, the station doctor and colleagues were unable to revive her.

The attack took place on Tuesday July 22 at around 16.50 hrs local time. None of her colleagues were injured.

BAS Press Officer Athena Dinar yesterday confirmed to *Penguin News* that Kirsty's family want her body returned to the UK.

Ms Dinar said. "... BAS aircraft are currently in Calgary so it will be a case of getting them to the Falklands and looking at when we can fly into Antarctica.

"We would normally fly there in October when the weather is better, instead we will be awaiting a weather window in the next few weeks..."

Director of BAS, Professor Chris

Rapley CBE said, "This is tragic and shocking.

"My heart goes out to Kirsty's family and her colleagues at Rothera. Kirsty was a vibrant, dynamic individual committed to her science and with a promising scientific career ahead of her.

"The Rothera team reacted in a highly efficient and professional manner of which we, and they, can be proud. They are, however shaken by the loss of a colleague and will need our support."

Leopard seals are often inquisitive when they encounter humans. However, they are not generally known to attack humans unless provoked.

Farm support for abattoir

A GENEROUS proportion of farmers support the development of the Falkland Islands Meat Company, but not at any cost, confirmed Rural Business Association (RBA) Chairman Ian Hansen this week.

He told *Penguin News*, "The majority of farmers don't hold the current Development Corporation team, under the leadership of Julian Morris, accountable for the situation we find the abattoir in and are generally supportive of the new team.

"During the very positive Famers' week we only had a year's figures available, which included money lost on teething problems. We feel it should be reviewed again at the end of next year to compare.

"There is a big level of support from farmers, proved with the recent AI/ET programme. £67,000 of farmers' own non-subsidised money was put back into government through the programme. A large percentage of embryos were dual, which shows the level of commitment to the future of the abattoir.

"There is a working group of farmers (RBA members) who are having regular meetings with Connie Stevens and John Ferguson, and the group will keep other farmers updated on the abattoir process."

RBA Member Rodney Lee said. "...the general public have too little information at the moment to judge for sure if the abattoir is going to work or not. Most have no idea what the detailed running costs of the abattoir are, let alone whether or not there are improvements to be made. Again, although we had the 'open day' at the end of Farmers Week, and very good it was, it really only showed you what happened on a good day and not the real problems that are incurred on the not-so-good days.

"There are almost certainly ways of cost cutting in these areas, but decisions need to be made as to exactly what markets we are going to follow so that the management of the operation can be tailored to suit."

End of year by- election

ALEGISLATIVE Council byelection must be held within 70 days of an Elected Member vacating his/her seat according to Falklands law.

QUITE rightly legislation exists in the Falklands to protect our society from crimes that have so far never been committed, are unlikely to be committed, but potentially may one day be committed.

Preparing for the eventuality of transgressions here, that are already being perpetrated in other countries, is an enlightened approach, so I am baffled why we have not taken the obvious step to effectively protect local

and migrant workers.

Whether or not St. Helenians and Chilean workers, in particular those at Mount Pleasant Complex, are being exploited in salary terms is arguable. After all on top of their meagre wage they receive accommodation and food

But the very fact that exploitation of employees is a problem in all other countries, and there is sufficient discomfort in the Islands on this subject to generate argument and investigations is surely reason enough why councillors should be doing more than paying lip service.
Why are they, "...not minded to legislate?"

Have they given good reason?
Is there pressure from the MoD contractors against legislation?

Are they waiting for exploitation to actually commence before they decide to do anything about it?

Laws affecting minimum wage in the UK are relatively simple. The employer must not pay less than £4.10 an hour (If you are between 18 and 22 years old, or you are over 22 but in the first six months of employment and taking part in training you can be paid £3.20 an hour).

The national minimum wage doesn't apply if you are under 18; are under 19 and employed as an apprentice: or you are under 26 and in the first

12 months of an apprenticeship.

If you are not being paid the minimum wage you can complain. The Inland Revenue is responsible for enforcing the law and can make an em-

ployer pay you the national minimum wage as well as back pay.

Of course employers in the UK have all sorts of nasty tricks to get around this, including deducting for uniform or demanding employers turn up half an hour early and leave half an hour late, but still a good deal of protection exists and most employers don't take the chance of being caught flouting British legislation.

Employers in the Falkland Islands who may be on the borderline of exploiting their employees are never going to re-examine salaries with any

seriousness unless the law demands they do so.

This is an issue set to run and *Penguin News* would be interested to

hear from residents and migrant workers alike, on the subject.

Public meeting reports

More accessible information?

IMPROVEMENT of access to government information was raised by a member of the public at a meeting held on Tuesday evening.

Councillor John Birmingham said he and his colleagues would be addressing the issue of access to information at the meeting of General Purposes Committee on Wednesday.

The member of the public asked if minutes of meetings could be available more readily, in electronic form and from the public library. Councillors agreed this should be possible

Regarding agendas for closed sections of government committee meetings, the member of the public referred to an article published in last week's Penguin News about an decision taken by the Health and Medical Services Committee to place an item on the agenda of the

closed part of the meeting when, in fact, it could have been discussed publicly.

She said committees should discuss which items are to be excluded from the public during the open part of the meeting and give reasoning for the exclusion.

Councillor Cockwell said it was impossible to know which way such a discussion could go and confidentiality of individuals had to be ensured

Councillor Summers said he felt the broader issue at hand was the entire committee system and whether the government does enough to publish decisions made.

He said he felt more needed to be done by the government to push information out into the public domain, however this would cost money

Forbes case: will officials be accountable?

FOLLOWING criticism of senior government officials by the Acting Judge in the FIG v Gordon Forbes Supreme Court proceedings, a member of the public asked who would be held responsible.

Councillor Roger Edwards said he and his colleagues would be looking at all aspects of the case and discussing it in the near future.

Councillor Summers added that, despite the Acting Judge's criticism, no individual had yet been shown to be at fault.

When questioned about the time

scale and financial costs of the legal action, Councillor Summers explained arbitration was a common proceeding following a major construction contract through which the contractor, "...will try to claim every possible pound.

Councillor Summers said the claim by Gordon Forbes stands in the order of £1.6 million and to date legal fees have cost the government around £600,000. He added that Executive Council considered every month the cost of the case and whether to continue to fight the claim.

Cllr Cheek's support for minimum wage

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL do not intend to take action to improve the conditions under which St Helenians and Chileans are employed at Mount Pleasant.

Responding to a question from Penguin News at Tuesday evening's public meeting, Councillor Roger Edwards said that the pay received by such workers, believed to be in the region of £500 per month, was boosted by the provision of free food and accommodation, making the real pay bracket closer to £800.

Replacement racecourse

THE Golf Club and Stanley Sports Association (SSA) need to get together and approach the Lands Committee to discuss a new site for their facilities, say councillors.

Official notice has been given by the Falkland Islands Company. the owners of the land on which the racecourse exists, saying they want the land back in 2006.

Former and current Lands Committee Chairmen, Councillor Cockwell and Councillor Norma Edwards said the committee has been asking for some time for the Golf Club and SSA to get together to map out their requirements and a possible alternate site.

He said the pay conditions were. "...clearly better than elsewhere." or the jobs would not have been taken up.

When asked if councillors intended to take legislative action to improve the employment conditions at Mount Pleasant, Councillor Edwards responded, "...we are not minded to legislate at present.

Councillor Jan Cheek argued however that the government should be legislating for a minimum wage for the whole of the country.

Public abattior meeting

A PUBLIC meeting dedicated to the abattoir is to be held in the next few weeks.

Following a number of questions from members of the public regarding the abattoir. Councillor Roger Edwards said he was eager to have a public meeting dedicated to the project.

He said he was keen for the Development Corporation General Manager, Julian Morris, to give the same presentation to the meeting as that which he gave to last week's special meeting between the Standing Finance Committee and the Falkland Islands Development Board.

Mr Lee also feels that those who comprehend the detailed costs and operational problems, "...may not be fully aware of the farming practices that could possibly be changed to improve the quality and quantity of the product needed for the abattoir.'

On sheep numbers he said. Port Howard are only running a third of our stock as breeding sheep at present, but this could fairly easily be increased if the economics added up

"We could also change the type of stock we supply. This is relevant to a fair percentage of Falkland Farms so could have a significant effect if everyone had the will to make it work.

He added, "Then there are the people who say it will not work because of the marketing side of the operation with the main argument being the distance from the market, but I would argue that there is a fairly big market close to home.

We need to do more with our product in improving the quality and reliable availability of it, which I am convinced would increase sales to the local population, fishing boats, tourist boats and the mili-

"I would agree that we probably have quite a way to go but it is far from impossible to achieve if we all put enough effort into it. If we all keep saying it will fail, there is nothing surer than the fact that it will fail

"I am a believer in that this abattoir can work in one form or an-

other if we accept that the capital cost is written off."

Dunnose Head farmer, Clive Wilkinson, rabidly disagrees with this outlook.

Yesterday he told Penguin News he was not in support of the abattoir. He commented, "We just can't compete against companies established in this line of business - we haven't got the turnover.

"We can't produce better quality more cheaper than the compe-

"I think the government should cut their losses and run.

Mr Wilkinson added, "I'd like to know where this all came from in the first place? Who hatched this idea? Who is responsible for this waste of money?

The comments from Mr Wilkinson, Mr Lee, and Mr Hansen come in the wake of last week's Penguin News leading article which reported that FIDC General Manager Julian Morris has recommended a 'tactical withdrawal' from the export market for the Falkland Islands Meat Company unless 'value' can be added through a joint venture with a Chilean partner.

Mr Morris told a joint Standing Finance Committee/Development Board meeting that since the abattoir project first began, the capital cost has quadrupled, the number of staff has tripled, the frequency of shipping has more than halved and the cost of shipping a northbound reefer is triple the 2003

Taxi driver's 'absolute last chance'

THE Senior Magistrate has given a Stanley taxi driver, " .. one absolute fast chance," of retaining his licence following a conviction for careless

A short trial was held on Wednesday after Derek MacDonald, a taxi driver, pleaded not guilty to charges of reckless driving and driving without due care and attention on June

Evidence was given by a com-plainant who said that Mr MacDonald had failed to stop as she crossed Ross Road on the pedestrian crossing near the Town Hall

Mr MacDonald, who did not have legal representation for the trial, did not call witnesses for his defence

After a brief adjournment, the Senior Magistrate, Nick Sanders, said that to be found guilty of reckless driving, a serious offence, the prosecution had to prove Mr MacDonald drove in a way which created an obvious and serious risk of damage to a person or property and he was not satisfied this was the case. However, he said Mr MacDonald's driving fell below the normal standard of a reasonable competent driver and therefore found him guilty of the lesser offence, careless driving.

He fined him £200 and ordered him to pay £70 prosecution costs.

He told Mr MacDonaldhe would not take his licence away from him as it could cause, "...exceptional hardship," and it would not be, "...of great benefit for you to lose your only livelihood

He added that this was Mr MacDonald's, "...absolute last chance," to keep his licence

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

Death of *Belgrano* case judge

THE judge who presided over a controversial court case in Britain about the sinking of the Argentine cruiser *General Belgrano* in the 1982 Falklands War has died, aged 75

It was one of the most politically controversial trials of the Thatcher reign.

The judge, Sir Anthony McCowan, was in charge of the case in which a senior civil servant of the Ministry of Defence. Clive Ponting, was charged under the Official Secrets Act with leaking an internal Ministry of Defence document about the sinking of the Argentine warship.

He had handed the document to a Labour Member of Parliament. Mr Tam Dalyell, who conducted a campaign against the Prime Minister, Margaret Thatcher, for ordering the sinking of the Belgrano.

The document indicated that the Argentine cruiser had been sailing away from the Falkland exclusion zone when it was torpedoed by a British submarine. HMS Contagnet.

Echoes in Blair's Iraq Crisis

The case has echoes in the present crisis facing Tony Blair's government over allegations that he misled Parliament into supporting the invasion of Iraq, highlighted by the suicide of a Ministry of Defence weapons expert, Doctor David Kelly, who leaked information to BBC correspondents about intelligence documents focusing on whether Iraq had weapons of mass destruction in Iraq.

In the *Belgrano* case in 1985, Ponting argued that by leaking the *Belgrano* document he prevented Parliament from being misled. He claimed that his action was in the interests of the State, a defence permitted under the Official Se-

crets Act

Judge McCowan ruled against him, declaring that the interests of the State must mean the interests of the Government of the day, to which the Civil Service was bound by a relationship of trust.

Jury rejected Judge's ruling But the jury rejected his ruling and acquitted Ponting, a victory which was widely welcomed as a victory for commonsense and a vindication of the jury system

The document leaked by Ponting fuelled the controversy over the justification for sinking the Belgrano with heavy loss of life.

However British Task Force Commanders and the Government justified its sinking by arguing that the heavily armed cruiser was a dangerous threat to the Task Force and the campaign to liberate the Falklands Islands.

The Ponting case did not cause lasting damage to Sir Anthony McCowan's career and his reputation as an extremely competent judge, becoming Senior Presiding Judge of England and Wales. Ill health forced his retirement in 1997.

Out of site: guitar tablature

Rodrigo Corderio's web site review

WITH the obvious exception of hardcore pornography, there are few more subjects on the internet with as much web space dedicated to them as guitar tablature sites.

Unfortunately, as with most of the internet only about 10% of that is of any use, so for those budding guitarists amongst you I have taken it upon myself to sort the sheep from the goats and offer a guide as to some of the best guitar web re-

sources around.

One of the best tab sites on the net has to be E-Tabs (www.e-tabs.org), apart from having a luge collection of tabs that's easy to peruse through, it also has brilliant news and lessons sections. Each tab can be ranked, and users can add their comments at the bottom (no registration required), which means that you can always tell a bad tab either by its poor ranking score or the anything-but-tactful comments at the bottom.

It also has a number of TV theme tune tabs, which is great fun. Especially since most non-guitarists can be entirely unmoved by an intricate demonstration involving scales and chords most complex, and yet giggle uncontrollably like idiots when you play them the theme tune from Bonanza.

Another excellent tab site is Ultimate Guitar (www ultimateguitar com) which, as well as tens of thousands of tabs, has a forum which you can discuss such fundamental matters as 'Dropped D tuning: Friend or Foe?' and 'Are telecasters ugly?' Well, who can honestly say they haven't lost sleep over that one?

Unfortunately there are a number of impertinent pop-up adverts that, well, pop up while you are on the page, which can get ever so slightly infuriating.

Reputed to be one of the best

guitar sites around, World Guitar (www.worldguitar.com) certainly has a lot to offer in terms of both tabs (guitar and bass) and lessons.

It also has a very useful scale finder which gives any scale from the trusty pentatonic to more obscure ones like Hungarian gypsy scales, should the need ever arise. Amongst its other tools you can also find a metronome (useful, although doesn't go below 100bpm) and a backing track generator (couldn't get it to work).

If it's backing tracks you're after though, then Olav Torvrund is your man, (www.torvund.net/guitar/Backing/index.asp). The backing tracks are a distinctive blues and rock n' roll style, and can get them many key, three different tempos and in a variety of different chord progressions. They're also in MIDI format which means they take very little to download.

If blues is your bag then you'd do well to check his out his lessons too; this guy certainly knows his onions when it comes to blues, although his own translation from Norwegian to English can make the lessons a little trying at first.

While a little limited for anything above intermediate players, Electric guitar.co.uk (www.electric-guitar.co.uk) is a great site for beginners. It offers a wide array of lessons comprehensible to even the least musical minded.

It has a large collection of funky riffs and licks to impress your friends with too, just on the off chance that they've actually gotten bored of listening to you play the intro to Smoke on the water for the billionth time.

When you can't find a particular tab anywhere try Tab Robot (www.tabrobot.com), this metasearch engine rifles through hundred of tab sites so you don't have

to, which can be very useful, but it also has been known to produce a mountain of results which have nothing to do with the original search.

Just in case you can't tell your G*7sus4's from your G*m9th's (well duh...). Jim Cranwell's Chord generator (guitar.to/folder/guitar.html) is quick, stupidly easy to use and has just about any chord you could ever dream up. The same site also has chord generators for banjo, ukulele, mandolin and bass; although I would venture that the concept of playing more than one note at the same time would be something of an Olympian task for most bass players.

So there you have it, a comprehensive guide to guitar resources on the net. Of course, die hard traditionalists will scoff and comment that any guitarist worth his salt will never look at a tab, but spend days and nights ear to the speaker and fingers on the fret-board, to the point of drawing blood if need be.

All fair enough I guess, but tabs can be useful when you can't spare the time, or when your mind goes blank after three hours listening to the same tune, scouring the murky depths of the augmenteds and diminisheds and pulling your hair out only to conclude that it is G-bloody-7th in the bridge of the Postman Pat theme tune after all.





THERE are a couple of oddities relating to the new law that allows young persons under 16 to ride a motorcycle on Stanley Common without being subject to the road traffic laws.

While being a welcome relief in the anomaly that makes everywhere within four miles of Stanley a road, it seems that the new law means a15-year-old can be riding recklessly, and without a helmet, and with no insurance, and would commit no offence

However his friend, who might be a few weeks older at 16, would commit a whole range of offences if he were doing exactly the same thing at the same time on the same track and only a few yards apart.

Also, the new order only applies to motorcycles, and the law in the Islands does not automatically extend this to trikes and quadbikes.

Is this a fair interpretation? Our thanks to Crown Counsel, Rosalind Cheek, for the following

The matter was dealt with by the Road Traffic (Amendment) Ordinance 2003 which permits the Governor to make an Order making exceptions to that Ordinance.

The Stanley Common (Young Motorcyclists) Order 2003 then specifically provided that the provisions of the Road Traffic Ordinance would have no effect in relation to the use of motorcycles by those under the age of 16 on Stanley Common (excepting various roads eg Stanley Bypass).

The effect of the amending law is indeed that a person over the age of 16 years old riding a motorcycle on a relevant part of Stanley Common could be subject to the Road Traffic Ordinance. A person in that situation under the age of 16 years would not.

The word "motorcycle" is not defined under the Road Traffic

Ordinance or under the Stanley Common (Young Motorcyclists) Order 2003. "Motorcycle" is however defined under English legislation as a mechanically propelled vehicle, not being an invalid carriage, with less than four wheels the weight of which does not exceed 410kg. It would therefore be a matter for the court as to whether they sought to apply the English definition or whether they sought to apply a broader approach in the Falkland Islands to include quad bikes within the definition of "motorcy-

WHAT is the policy on foot patrols by RFIP Officers in Stanley? Have they been discontinued or reduced and if so, why?

Superintendent David Morris commented, "The policy on foot patrols is that all officers should do at least 30% of the shift on foot patrol, they have not been reduced in fact they have been increased.

The officers do have other operational commitments which sometimes takes precedence."

Will the driver of a police vehicle who was recently involved in a road traffic accident, in which damage to that vehicle was sustained, be subject to investigation?

Superintendent Morris answered, "The recent police RTA has already been fully investigated and a report sent to H E The Governor, Government Secretary and the Attorney Generals Chambers.'

Health budget: cut director

IF we have to trim Medical Budgets, why not start with the overstaffing?

Originally the Director of Health Services post was created temporarily to enable a suitable person to overhaul the old administration and put modern systems in place so the department - which is not a UK Health Area with millions of patients - could then be run efficiently by the Chief Medical Officer and a good administra-

As usual, temporary posts become permanent.

I have nothing against the post holder at all, he does well, but do under 3,000 people really justify the cost of £53,000 - 65,000 a year plus housing, plus travel, etc?

Also councillors themselves have incurred increased capital costs and will be increasing staffing costs on the upcoming old folks homes and care centre because they are having it built piecemeal in various parts of the town, all because they were scared to do the obvious thing in the public national interest and compulsory purchase (at full market values and offer alternative land) the obvious central area of land in private ownership largely unused.

The power a few seem to exert over our democratic leaders is worrying at times.

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THE Supreme Court case of the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) against Gordon Forbes Construction (Falklands) Ltd came to a conclusion last week, with a judgement in favour of the building firm.

Evidence was presented to Senior Magistrate, Nick Sanders, sitting as acting Judge of the Supreme court, in a four day hearing in June.

The legal application was made by the government, who had claimed that an award made in arbitration proceedings should be set aside as it was procured against public policy.

The arbitration proceedings, taking place in Scotland, had been brought by Gordon Forbes against FIG in respect of work done by that company on the East Stanley infrastructure development

In particular, they were claiming for the additional costs which the company incurred when Mike Forrest. Director of PWD, refused to supply aggregate from Pony's Pass Quarry to Gordon Forbes.

FIG had asserted that part of this claim had already been settled in correspondence between the Attomey General and Gordon Forbes' solicitors in July 1998. However, the arbitrator has ruled that this was not the case, deciding that the exchange of letters only related to a different matter involving a contract with Stanley Services

It was only after the arbitrator made the decision that FIG claimed to have found out that the Stanley Services contract was in fact made with a different Gordon Forbes company than the one involved in the settlement contract, saying that if the arbitrator had known about this, he would have reached a different decision.

However, in a forty-two page judgement, Judge Sanders reviewed the case and found:

 that Executive Council had been briefed in early 1998 by the Financial Secretary about the true identity of the contracting company in the Stanley Services Contract but had not made the connection when discussing the case with Gordon Forbes less than four months later;

that the contract paperwork on the Stanley Services Contract had been disclosed to FIG and that their agents in the UK had already reached a conclusion about the proper contracting party but that they failed to advise the Attorney General; and

that FIG had placed an unreasonable reliance on statements made to them by Gordon Forbes'

In respect of a number of false statements made to FIG by Gordon Forbes and his advisors, Judge Sanders stated that the court should only intervene in arbitration proceedings where there has been unreasonable behaviour amounting to fraud or similar conduct. After reviewing the case, he was not satisfied that such behaviour existed in this case, and he dismissed FIG's applica-

He added that there were few in this case who emerged with any credit, criticising the conduct of Gordon Forbes and his advisors and the Attorney General and other government officers, and the Government's legal agents in the UK for various failures during both the negotiations and the legal case it-

The question of costs has been adjourned for the parties to make further representations once they have considered the judgement.

CE's e-mail to judge

The Court also heard how, after all the evidence had been heard, an e-mail had been sent by the Chief Executive to the Senior Magistrate who was hearing the case.

This e-mail covered several areas, including discussion on the terms of the Senior Magistrate's contract and had also raised a query about the timing of the judgement of the Gordon Forbes case.

The Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins, had subsequently apologised to the Court for raising the issue of the Gordon Forbes case in correspondence dealing with contract terms, and assured the Court that he had not intended in any way to influence the Senior Magistrate's decision

His apology was accepted by both the Court and the parties in the Gordon Forbes case, and in the circumstances the Senior Magistrate felt that he could continue to hear the case in a fair and impartial man-

Inquest into fisherman's death

AN INQUEST into the death of a fisherman was opened and adjourned on Monday.

Timofey Gustov, aged 38, died on the afternoon of July 15 onboard the Russian fishing vessel Ivan Klyusin which was fishing for

toothfish off South Georgia.

The Coroner received evidence of identification and the inquest was then adjourned by the Coroner for further investigation.

A post-mortem is due to take place late this week.

Forbes case: Sanders' judgement | East road gang to head West

THE move to West Falkland of the road building team currently based on the East, is to go ahead.

Councillor Philip Miller spoke to the Transport Advisory Com-mittee at their meeting on Monday afternoon, asking them to reconsider their previous decision to move the East Falkland road gang to West Falkland before the end of the forthcoming season.

Councillor Miller argued that the figures of work remaining on East Falkland previously presented to the committee were inaccurate, placing the total distance remaining at 12km as opposed to 36.5km, which Councillor Miller claimed was the real distance.

The figures were incorrect and misleading," commented Council-lor Miller, "...had I been present at the meeting with those facts I would have also agreed to send the East team to West Falkland for this

Member of the committee. Councillor Mike Summers, replied that the discrepancies in the figures aside, there were a lot more factors that had to be considered and that, " . one kilometre of road in East Falkland does not necessarily equate to one kilometre of road in West Falkland."

Councillor Summers added .. there is a real need for roads in the West, where there are more people affected.

Committee Chairman, Councillor Stephen Luxton reiterated this point adding, "The current programme is designed to address the most concerns in the least time pos-

Councillor Miller considered that the necessity for roads in East Falkland was just as great as the West, arguing that, "... farms on West Falkland will always have to rely on air and sea links to some extent, whereas the certain farms on East Falkland are almost entirely dependant on land trans-

After discussion the committee voted on the subject, with six members voting against Councillor Miller's proposal and two in favour. It was therefore decided to maintain the current program and move the East road team.

Councillor Miller later told Penguin News, "Bitterly disappointed is an understatement - still I was grateful for the opportunity to make the presentation.

Education: progress follows inspection

AN UPDATE on the action plans implemented in all schools after the recent inspection was presented at the monthly meeting of the Education Board last Friday

Headteachers from both Stanley schools and from Camp Education attended the meeting, giving small presentations of progress so far on the action plans.

All three expressed their satisfaction at how headway was being made and all targets that could have been achieved so far have been achieved

Shorter school year

During the meeting the effects of both the shortening of the school year and the newly implemented action plan were discussed and all headteachers agreed that in spite of the difficulties that arose during the changes, the level of education hadn't suffered.

The Falklands school year has been altered to begin in September instead of January. The move was taken to allow students to sit GCSE examinations in June as the number

of subjects available to be taken in November, as was previously the case, have been drastically reduced. The current school year will run for only two terms to allow for the adjustment to the revised year lay-

Director of Education Sylvia Cole told the meeting that students had not been seriously affected by the changes and congratulated the staff of all three schools on the extraordinary amount of work taken on this year and how much had been achieved.

Holidays during term time

Also at the meeting, deep concern was expressed at the amount of school days missed by students taking extended holidays outside the Islands during term time, particularly following public concern over the shortening of the school year and its possible effects on students.

The board agreed to undertake a campaign in the near future to raise awareness of the disadvantages suffered by students who take extended absences.

Phillipa's voice coaching is free for all

PUBLIC speakers in the Falklands can increase their skills with a series of workshops beginning next month.

Voice Coach Philippa Thompson from Mount Pleasant will begin the workshops on August 14. The workshops are open to all, free of charge, and will include coaching on voice production, on avoiding voice strain and confidence building.

Participant Norman McGregor Edwards commented, "A lot of tourist guides, church members. teachers, members of FIODA and those who speak in public have expressed an interest so we are expecting strong support for this unique opportunity to learn from a professional voice coach.

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Maersk service for fishing industry?

ONE of the largest shipping companies in the world are interested in offering container services to the Falklands.

Representatives of Danish company, Maersk Sealand are Martin Persico and Juan Corujo. They are currently visiting the Islands to examine the potential of a container service, "...because of the closeness of the Islands to South Atlantic fishing grounds and the volumes of fish currently shipped by reefer vessel."

In the Falklands, the fishing industry, "...believe there is much economic potential for growth and development of fishing and maritime industries if a proportion of seafood shipments were containerised," commented Chamber of Commerce Chairman, Hamish Wylie.

Speaking to Penguin News this week Snr Persico and Snr Corujo explained they have been meeting the potential customer in the Islands and gathering data, ".. to see if we can come to a good conclusion."

Snr Corujo said, "We want to find out what the needs of the customer are, and develop something useful for the community.

He said they have had "...a very positive reaction; we have detected, compared to a couple of years ago, that there is now a need for a regular container service connecting you to the rest of the world, not only the UK but other places where your products can be exported to, and also bring whatever you need here."

Snr Persico said, "...commercially speaking the potential is here to make it feasible on the income side of the business. We are still not to sure on the operational side as regards to infrastructure and whether our ships are capable of operating in the area."

Snr Corujo said. The government has worked to promote this trip to

the Islands . we have been very well received, not only from the government but from the community also, everyone we have talked to even on the street has been very polite and very helpful..."

The pair explained it is hoped the service will be established, "...soon." If things go well they will be returning and, "...if it is all going along the right path, some higher level of the organisation will come as well, but

we will see how it works with regard to the numbers."

Mr Wylie added. "The idea is that if it is feasible it will be a fortnightly service - the vessels are already running, it is just a matter of if we have enough export potential, it is the fish that will make it work, not local input.

"Really it is down to the fishing community to get itself together and organise itself to utilise the service. Providing the figures stack up and Maersk can provide a service that is going to be competitive with what is happening at the moment, not just on price but in service and flexibility, then I am sure this will make it happen.

"But again it is a matter of whether

"But again it is a matter of whether it is feasible and if it doesn't pan out at the moment maybe in a few years time it might start looking feasible, so I think that this is quite an important start in that it sets the groundwork."

He added, "It fits in with the fisheries policy and how that will enable the fishing industry to be more effective customers, and also coupled with the port infrastructure paper, it is just making the Falklands better connected with the rest of the world."

Snr Persico and Snr Corujo are currently based in the Buenos Aires regional office

A Danish company, AP Moller owns Maersk Sealand. The company have 300 offices in 100 countries, operate over 250 container vessels and own and operate many container terminals.

Falkland Islands fishing companies and the Economic Adviser have met with senior Maersk managers at international trade fairs over the last two years...

The Maersk representatives have a particular interest in plans for a port authority and commercial port development.

They came to the Islands at the invitation of the Vessel Owners Association. The Economic Advisor Mike Harte has been acting as the FIG Ilaison for their visit. Discussions with the Principal Immigration Officer indicate there are no immigration concerns about their Argentine nationality.



Speech and Language Therapy in the Falklands

I AM often asked, "What does a Speech and Language Therapist do?" Many people think we teach elocution or drama but we don't do either of those things!

Who are the Speech and Language Therapists?

In the Falkland Islands we currently have two part time Speech and Language Therapists, working the equivalent of one full time job.

I work half time all year and Lesley Cherriman works here full time for 24 weeks of the year, in three eight week blocks. Lesley has started this year and is a UK trained and registered Speech and Language Therapist. She lives and works in Punta Arenas with her husband when she is not working here

Where do they work?

We are both employed by the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital

I cover the work at the hospital and also spend time at the Infant and Junior School and Camp Education. Lesley covers the Falkland Islands Community School and the Infant and Junior School and Camp Education when she is here in the

What do Speech and Language Therapists do in the Falkland Islands?

Our area of speciality is communication. We have been trained to assess and treat people with communication problems. We work with people of all ages and with all areas of communication including speech, writing, reading, signs, symbols and gestures. We also work with people who have difficulties swallowing food and

Communication is vital. Imagine having a stroke and no longer being able to say and write what you want - even with your family. Or being in a classroom and only understanding half of what is being said during a lesson. Without an effective means of communication people are very isolated.

In the Falklands I also look after people with hearing problems as we do not have an Audiologist working here full time.

Speech Therapy at the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital. At the KEMH I work with chil-

dren (usually aged around 18 months - 3 years) and adults of all

Speech therapy services for Adults at the KEMII

With inpatients I am involved when someone has a stroke that affects their eating and drinking and communication. Firstly assessing and helping them with any swal-lowing problems and then helping them learn to communicate again. Sometimes they may also need help with drooling; it can be an embarrassing problem when some of the muscles of the mouth are

not working properly.
With adult outpatients I work with people to help them try and overcome a variety of communication difficulties. For example; helping someone who loses their voice continually, or helping with stuttering or other speech problems.

I also work closely with the visiting Audiologist and Ear Nose and Throat Surgeon and in between their visits I perform hearing tests and provide and fit hearing aids. Carmen Miranda also helps with hearing aid orders, and general repairs and maintenance.

Speech therapy services for children at the KEMH

We all worry about our children. Amongst all our day to day worries as parents there is always the question of whether or not our children are developing normally and what we can do. Part of my job is to help parents with young children who are not talking, or are slow to talk. Sometimes a child will require therapy, but often it is advice and reassurance for the parents that is needed.

I also test children's' hearing, especially if they are prone to ear infections as hearing difficulties can affect speech and language development.

School aged children are also able to be seen at the hospital instead of the schools at the parent's

Speech therapy services at the schools

At the schools we work with the teaching staff to help the children. Communication is a critical skill for learning, reading, writing and thinking. We work with children in the classroom, or in small groups, or individually, to help them with problems they may be hav-

Sometimes children need help learning:

- to say all of the speech sounds
- to talk in sentences and use all the "little words and grammati-cal endings" that are appropriate for their age
- to use signs or symbol systems to help them to communicate while their speech is developing, or to aid their speech if it is hard to understand
- how to talk fluently (dealing with stuttering)
- to develop their vocabulary (we often learn some new words from them as well!)
- about social skills for example, learning how to talk to other people in groups
- how to listen effectively and understand complex instructions (especially important in the classroom)

about the link between sounds and letters to help with reading and spelling and their speech.

At the Community School there is also a major emphasis on helping children understand the curriculum and the complex language in each subject. This may involve working with the Special Needs Co-ordinator/Specialist Teacher and Subject Teachers to adapt the curriculum for particular children.

Children with hearing difficulties and/or hearing aids are also given support at school.

Team work - parents are important

We work as part of a team. This includes parents and any, or all, of the following: teaching staff, medical staff, and social work staff.

We like to encourage parents to come in and see what their child is doing in speech therapy. We may also set homework that we ask parents to help their child complete. Parents are always welcome in speech therapy sessions!

We also aim to provide education about communication, for doctors, teachers, parents and the gen-

eral public.
What to do if you want to see a Speech and Language Therapist.

For children:
* If you are concerned about your young child it is usually best to speak to the Health Visitor or your GP. They will be happy to refer you to the speech therapist.

* If your child is at school, the

school may suggest a referral to the speech therapist if they are concerned about your child, or parents can ask the school for a referral. Alternatively parents can see a GP to ask for a referral.

For adults:

Your GP, the ward staff, practice nurse, occupational health nurse or district surses can refer you.

Therapy

Therapy is tailored to the individual and their needs. Some people may only need to be seen once - others may be seen for extended periods of time. For young chil-dren therapy is mainly done through play and games, - most young children enjoy speech therapy.

Lipstick, shoes and chocolate cake recipes - you can never have too many of them!

Ingredients 250ml water 330g sugar 125g butter 2Tbsp cocoa 1/2tsp bicarbonate of soda 225g SR flour

Method

Combine the first 5 ingredients in a pan over a low heat until the sugar dissolves.

Bring to the boil.

Simmer for 5 minutes.

Transfer to a mixing bowl and cool for 10 minutes.

Add flour and eggs.

Beat until smooth.

Bake 40 minutes in a moderate oven.

Cool for 10 minutes in the tin, and then turn out.

55g sugar 120g icing sugar

125g Camembert

125g butter

2 Tbsp chopped butter 500g SR flour

3 Tosp milk

125g grated cheddar Salt & Pepper

Bush's 'unconditional' support



ARGENTINE President Nestor Kirchner said on Wednesday that he had received "unconditional" support from George Bush for his country's economic recovery and for the Argentine stance in negotiations with the IMF.

"We found open support, determined and unconditional support from the president for the recovery process we are seeing through in Argentina, truly without any type of conditions." Kirchner said after an Oval Office meeting.

He said that the commitment of the United States goes beyond support for negotiations with the International Monetary Fund, with which Buenos Aires is negotiating a threeyear loan agreement to avoid defaulting on its debts to multilateral lenders. Argentina stopped making repayments to private creditors in December 2001

This is Kirchner's first visit to Washington since he took over as president and his purpose is, "...to show that he is a strong leader with a credible (economic) growth programme," said Eric Farnsworth. vice president of the Council of the Americas business association.

The Argentine economy is showing signs of recovery, after shrinking 11.3 percent in 2002, with an 18.8 percent unemployment rate. but foreign investors and the United States expect Argentina to implement a program that will ensure long-term growth.

In his two-day visit, the Argentine president, traveling with Economy Minister Roberto Lavagna, attempted to rebuild confidence in his country, but significantly, he did not meet with IMF or World Bank officials. Farnsworth described this as "shrewd" politics. "He thus avoids showing himself asking for IMF support," he told to the press. "In Argentina this is good, it signals power.

Kirchner also wants closer links with the United States, after the "carnal" relationship - as former President Carlos Menem called it at the end of the 1990s - ended in

Argentine oil reserves are falling

ARGENTINA'S oil reserves have dropped 3% and natural gas 10% according to Argentine industry experts who urgently demanded incentives for long term investments in risk exploration.

Other demands include the gradual elimination of the 20% surtax on crude exports and a redrafting of the natural gas price at the well. However the Argentine government has repeatedly refused to raise frozen public utility rates arguing the country is in. "...a social and economic emergency."

A review of natural gas prices would have a direct impact in electricity rates, transport and overall industry costs.

But the Argentine oil industry

insists in warning the risks involved and negative effects for reserves and the absence of new investments in the area.

We need more wells; we have 91% of high risk areas unexplored." indicated former Energy Secretary Daneil Montamat who added that. ...risk exploration needs clear long

term signals and certain incentives. could be similar to those currently in the mining industry (30 years of

fiscal stability).

Argentina has 16 years natural gas reserve which has now fallen to 14, 15 years, and, "...proven reserves have to be de categorized if prices are not profitable," explained Mr Montamat.

Argentine economy forecast to grow...

ARGENTINA'S economy is expected to expand between 5 and 5.5% this year according to the latest report from the country's Economy Minister Roberto Lavagna who is one of the few top officials to accompany President Nestor Kirchner this Wednesday in his two days visit to the United States The previous forecast was 4.5 to 5%.

We've modified GDP growth estimates for this year taking it to 5.5% since all indicators, physical production, number of jobs, hours worked and confidence level unanimously point upwards," indicated Mr Lavagna

"What was previously a ceiling is now the floor", said the enthusiastic minister who was responding this way to Sunday Buenos Aires press reports regarding taxes and

The President is concerned with the publication of news that doesn't respond to what is really happening," said Mr Lavagna who insisted that industry and the overall economy will. "...continue to

Last Sunday Buenos Aires newspapers published that government expenditure must drop or revenue increase (taxes) if the 2004 budget surplus target of 2.5% of GDP was to be reached and that growth rate for the coming year would stabilize in 4.5%, down from 4.9% in 2003

The press also indicated that the 2004 budget was being drafted on the assumption of an annual inflation of 10% and a 4% revaluation of the Argentine currency. Another contentious issue, the elimination of taxes on exports and bank current accounts, as demanded

by the IMF, was rejected by Mr. Lavagna

The Argentine minister stressed that the first six months of 2003 ended with a budget surplus of 4,930 billion pesos, well above the 4.5 billion pesos agreed with the IMF and is spite of having given extraordinary financial assistance to Santa Fe province that suffered disastrous floods during last May and June

However other members of the cabinet admitted the government was working to avoid the economy slowing into a "plateau". Interior Minister Aníbal Fernández in a radio interview said, "...we're trying to avoid a plateau since the economy is growing strongly and for this we must emphasize on short term expectations

Regarding President Kirchner's recent visit to Europe Mr Lavagna who will be meeting with IMF and US Treasury officials this Wednesday in Washington, admitted that French businessmen were, "...a bit disenchanted." with the Argentine president who did not meet with them while his one day stay in Paris.

In Spain President Kirchner also caused strong reactions from businessmen when he inferred that some Spanish companies in Argentina had profited far above "risk capital" level. Spain has investments totalling 45 billion Euros in Argentina.

Public utility companies belonging to European investors are demanding that the new Argentine government authorize rates that have been frozen since last year, to increase an average 65% to compensate for the December 2001 devaluation of the currency

...while Chile's economy is vulnerable

IT IS almost impossible for the Chilean economy to expand 4% in 2003 because of the slowing down of the world economy, since 60% of the country's GDP depends on

foreign trade.

Chilean Finance Minister Nicolas Eyzaguirre said this week in Santiago that although the government had targeted growth rate between 3 and 4%, and even when it still has to make official a lower forecast, "...expansion will be closer to the lower estimate.

We're not invulnerable to what happens to the world economy, and we therefore should not be surprised with a more modest than expected expansion result." said

Mr Eyzaguirre.

After growing at an annual average rate of 7% during most of the nineties the Chilean economy slowed down following the impact of the 97/98 Asian crisis and has since remained at relative low gear.

In 2002 the economy expanded 2,1% mainly because of the sluggishness of the US economy, the country's main trade partner.

However the Chilean economy has been the most stable of Mercosur and last week marked a new record in "country risk"

It's excellent news, the lowest ever for Chile, just 116 points. But we must keep persevering," said President Ricardo Lagos.

"Having a lower country risk means we have access to loans with lower interest rates, we can improve investment chances, and more investment means more jobs. more activity," stressed Mr Lagos who nevertheless cautioned that. ...we live in a very competitive world, and must not let ourselves become complacent.

A 116 points means Chile can borrow at 1.16% above the going

US bond rate.

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

Mount Pleasant contract workers spared tax but companies must pay up

CONTRACTOR companies at Mount Pleasant Complex (MPC) will soon be subject to Falkland Islands tax but employees will not

His Excellency the Governor Howard Pearce confirmed this week that MPC employees of contractor companies, "...will for the present retain their privileged tax position but this will be subject to review over the coming years."

Asked why the distinction had been made, Councillor Mike Summers told Penguin News. "The reason why we did not recommend taxing workers was threefold.

"In the first place it would have raised very substantial resentment at an individual level

This was evident at the public meeting we had there, and in correspondence. The resentment was because of widespread perception that individuals would not receive any corresponding benefit to the tax they pay, and many claimed that it was largely the tax free element that encouraged them to work in the Falklands in the first place - if they had to pay tax they would not work here. They do not pay tax at home either.

Councillor Summers explained

Councillor Summers explained that secondly, "... this would then have a significant knock on effect for employers. Either their wage bills would increase by the amount of the tax, or they would



have to employ lower grade staff, or lesser numbers of staff. Either way the additional cost would have to be passed on to the Ministry of Defence (MoD)."

Finally, he said there was strong opposition from the Commander British Forces and Command Secretary on behalf of MoD because it would increase the cost of defence. "There was concern that MPA would be required to absorb any increase in its own budget, causing local difficulties of choice in what to cut to pay for the additional tax."

Councillor Summers emphasised that councillors did not wish to cause an increase in the cost of defence, therefore the matter was dropped at a relatively early stage, after the first round of consultation

He added, "Corporation tax is different in that companies working at MPA already pay tax in their home jurisdiction, so it is only a swap.

There is no additional cost and they were not concerned where they paid their tax. The MoD were equally relaxed since the payment of tax in the Falklands is already catered for in the Falklands/UK double taxation agreement, and the Inland Revenue were not concerned. Companies working at MPA will therefore become assessable for Falklands tax on their profits from January 1, 2004.

"This is unlikely to result in any additional revenue until late 2005 or later."

Three months for `foolish prank'

A TWENTY-TWO year old Islander began a three month prison sentence on Wednesday, following "...a foolish prank between friends that went badly wrong," and resulted in, "...one of the worst cases of reckless driving," the Falklands court has witnessed.

Derek Gary McGill, an apprentice mechanic, pleaded guilty to charges of reckless driving and driving after consuming alcohol, following an incident in which his vehicle collided with a pedestrian.

Prosecutor Graham Cripps told the court that on Sunday, July 6, a group of four or five people, friends of Mr McGill, were walking to Deano's Bar and crossed John Street near Beauchene shopping complex. Two people from the group were on the road as Derek McGill approached in his Mitsubishi Pajero.

One walked to the side of the road but the other, Darryl Ford, remained "frozen" in the middle of the road. Mr McGill came closer then slammed on his brakes before colliding with Mr Ford. The police were notified and Mr McGill gave a positive road side breath test and was arrested. When breathalysed at the police station, he gave a lower reading of 100 micrograms of alcohol per 100 millilitres of breath. The legal limit is 35 micrograms.

Defence lawyer Rory Gilchrist said that earlier in the day, his client had drunk a number of cans of cider at lunch and had been home for a rest before going out again. He had made the, "...grave error," of assuming he was fit to drive

of assuming he was fit to drive.

He said Mr McGill saw Mr
Ford standing in the road and believed he was, "...inviting him to
drive towards him." When he realised Mr Ford was not moving he
braked but it was too late. Mr
Gilchrist added his client fully understood the serious nature of the
offences.

For reckless driving, Mr Sanders sentenced Mr McGill to three months in prison; for driving after consuming alcohol, he sentenced him to one month. The sentences will run concurrently.

Mr Sanders also disqualified Mr McGill from driving for thirty months from the date of his release from prison.

ALTHOUGH the arts are rather more my thing than the sciences, still I was held entirely captive by the TV programme DNA - The Story of Life, on Tuesday night.

Not simply because it's pretty mind boggling to imagine one's entire make-up to be ordained by a natty little code and some chemical soup, but just as intriguing was the politics and in-fighting that surrounded the 1950s race to discover the DNA structure.

It was fascinating to observe that no matter where you are in the world, and whatever the context or degree of intelligence of the individuals involved, ego will unavoidably enter the equation.

Not that that's always a bad thing - after all, without an element of competition would science have developed as rapidly?

But as was made clear in the programme, things might have progressed more efficiently if it hadn't been for their unwillingness to work together unwillingness generated by human sensitivities and personal ambitions.

But where am I going with this?
Well it all linked in quite nicely with an interesting chat I had with a gentleman this week on the subject of human weakness and its effect on decision making and development.

He made the very valid point that open government was all well and good, but it didn't deal with the problem that as human beings, some councillors might be inclined to 'play to the gallery' rather than make unpopular but

absolutely necessary decisions. I later thought, yes, it might be a difficulty with regard to some individuals, but I asked myself, should the weaknesses of a few, be good reason to

restrict the development of government as a whole?

And did his argument not underestimate the ability of the majority of our representatives to honestly and objectively examine their motivation for taking a particular stance?

Did it not also suggest that the watching public would be incapable of

spotting the opportunist seeking popularity!

And was it not based on the assumption that the public cannot be swayed by just and logical argument to understand the reasoning behind what might traditionally be an 'unpopular' decision?

And surely if councillors are obliged to make decisions in public will it not encourage them to more effectively and articulately argue their point of

view?

To 'play to the crowd' indicates the protagonist has shallow argument. If this is the case then certainly it is the responsibility of those retaining strong and logical arguments, to chew up the opportunist and damn well spit him

So throw open the doors of government and let the righteous disharmony commence...



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Fortuna inshore survey

THE Fisheries Committee has endorsed a proposal for a survey of inshore resources by Fortuna Limited.

The project could take around six months commencing in Decem-

Fortuna Director Jan Cheek commented, "...details are not finalised yet, it has to go to govern-ment for consideration. But we have been looking for some time at different approaches to the fishery and this will be undertaken with

our Japanese partners."
She added, "A great deal depends on a number of factors including the chartering of a suitable vessel and acceptance of various conditions that FIG will be placing on it, but if everything goes well we will start this summer.

Fortuna intend to use a small fresher vessel as opposed to a freezer vessel. This means the ship will carry ice but not freezers.

Mrs Cheek said, "If we get any-

thing in sufficient quantities to sell will bring it ashore to freeze in a series of short trips."

She added, "We will be subject to all of the normal conservation rules and probably some additional ones as it will be inshore."

Fortuna have four vessels currently fishing for loligo in Falklands waters. The loligo season started at midnight last night (Friday 1). They have one other vessel fishing on the high seas.

On Tuesday 29 the Fisheries Committee also considered recommendations for licence types and fees for the first season (January -June) of 2004.

Director of Fisheries John Barton commented, "It is proposed that licence types will remain the same, some increases in fees were recommended whereas it was felt that fees for some other licence types should remain unchanged. These recommendations will go on to ExCo for consideration.

Council revokes 'terminations' policy

COUNCILLORS have overturned their decision to withdraw funding for flights for termination of preg-

Councillors revisited the issue after they were presented with a petition of 450 names by the women's group.

Diet deteriorates children's teeth

FALKLANDS children's teeth are deteriorating due to diet rather than poor toothcare.

Director of Health and Social Services Norman McGregor Edwards confirmed this week that although there is little evidence of neglect of children's teeth in terms of brushing, a new hospital survey has highlighted a deteriorating situ-

Mr McGregor Edwards said, "We also conducted a non-scientific survey of older children's eating habits and discovered that many more of them eat like US or British children, in that they tend to graze rather than eat three square meals a

day."
This means that teeth rather than suffering three sugar attacks a day

are being subjected to up to as many as twelve sugar attacks in six hours.

The hospital intends to take action in the next few weeks by sending parents leaflet information about the situation.

Clearway v oneway?

A REPORT on the trial Ross Road clearway will be presented to Executive Council (ExCo) by the end of this year.

Members of ExCo also decided last week that after consideration of this report they would consider the trial of a oneway circular system for Ross Road and John Street.

Working to reduce seabird deaths

A PRESENTATION on the pro-

A PRESENTATION on the proposed National Plans of Action (NPOA) for reducing seabird mortality during longlining and trawling was given to members of the fishing community on Monday.

The presentation, by Dr Ben Sullivan of the Falklands Conservation Seabirds at Sea Team, was part of the second phase of consultation with the fishing community, designed to include as many interests from both fishing businesses and Falklands Conservation in the action plan as possible.

While current longlining lænse conditions already include the use of seabird mortality reduction procedures by vessels, the proposed NPOA sees new measures recommended in order to further protect seabird populations.

"The current level of longline mortality in Falkland Islands waters is unlikely to have a significant impact at the population level on any of the species that breed in the Falkland Islands," said Dr Sullivan. "However, given the potential for high densities of seabirds that interact with longliners in local waters there is the potential for increased mortality levels and it is vital that the industry investigates improvements to reduce the potential for seabird bycatch."

The main seabird species at risk

from longlining activities are the black-browed albatross and southern giant petrel.

A draft plan of action was also formulated for the reduction of seabird bycatch during trawl related fishing. "Although there is currently no estimate of the annual level of mortality in the trawling fleet, the fact that over a hundred black-browed albatross deaths were recorded in a three month period in 2002 on finfish trawlers indicates a high annual level of mortality," commented Dr Sullivan

"While the level of mortality does appear to be highly seasonal it is critical to identify both the temporal and spatial nature of the problem."

A census of the Falklands blackbrowed albatross breeding populations carried out in 2000/01 estimated a decrease of 87,500 breeding pairs within a five year period, which led the World Conservation Union (IUCN) to reclassify the black-browed albatross from 'near threatened' to 'vulnerable'.

"Because of this, it is considered necessary for a plan of action for reducing seabird mortality during trawl fisheries to be drafted for the Falkland Islands," stated Mr Sullivan.

Some scepticism was expressed from representatives of the fishing community at the presentation as to whether any measures implemented would have any real effect, given that it was unlikely that other countries on the Patagonian shelf would implement similar measures in their fishing fleets in the near future, and showed concern at the extra cost that this could mean for fishing companies.

Speaking at the meeting Director of Fisheries John Barton addressed these concerns stating that, "...a lot of the recommendations wouldn't be exceedingly expensive to apply." Both he and Dr Sullivan emphasized the importance of, "...maintaining the image of an environmentally friendly fishery."

The draft POA's are to be discussed by the Falklands Fishery Liaison Group and Vessel Owners Association in the coming months, and will then will be put forward to Executive Council for approval.

Farmers discuss meat industry

A SERIES of meetings held to discuss the future of the Falklands meat industry have been held in Camp over the past week and the Development Corporation Marketing Manager says the consensus from farmers is to remain in the export market.

Connie Stevens said the meetings, so far held at Hope Cottage, Hill Cove and Fox Bay have been, "enormously worthwhile." She added. "Some difficult issues have been openly and extensively discussed and debated by a broad representation of the farming community, with over thirty farms in attendance at the three meetings.

"At the three venues to date, here has been overwhelming and unanimous support for the ongoing development of the Falkland Islands' meat industry and the abattoir."

A fourth meeting is to be held today (Friday) at Goose Green.

Mrs Stevens said the consensus of opinion at the meetings has been, "...that we should remain in the export market, whilst ensuring that all the key issues are explored and analysed fully - eg shipping/freight, joint venture opportunities, developing and improving our existing export operation and sales links - whilst at the same time farmers will be focusing on the grading, conformation and provision of livestock for both the local and export markets.

"It was felt that we should capitalise upon the experiences gained in the first season and a full season of better efficiencies can be monitored to give a truer picture of the

future."

A working group of a core group of farmers has been formed, and will be directly involved with the ongoing management and development of the Falkland Islands Meat Com-

pany.
Mrs Stevens said, "All farmers who attended the meetings are now fully informed of the present situation and will continue to be updated by members of the working group

on a regular basis."

She added, "We would like to thank all those farmers who gave up their time to come along to the meetings and for their invaluable input."

Hep A risk to FI travellers small says chief doctor

A 32% increase in Hepatitis A cases during the first five months of 2003 compared to a year ago has caused great concern among Chilean sanitary authorities who are seriously considering a massive vaccination campaign, however the Chief Medical Officer in the Falklands says the risk to travellers is small.

According to Chile's Public Health Ministry, 5,191 cases of Hepatitis A were reported in the country between January and May, in what seems a continuation of an August 2002 outbreak forecast to last until next September.

Dr Fernando Muñóz, head of the Regulation Control of the Ministry of Public Health indicated that the outbreak should decrease towards the end of the year, although the number of cases in winter months is considered "surprising"

ered "surprising".

He said, "We hope the outbreak of Hepatitis A to begin decreasing towards the end of the year, but we're surprised at the high rate of incidence during the whole year. We're still waiting for the winter decrease as happened in 2002, but actually the number of cases has gone up. said Dr Muñoz who admitted the Chilean government is assessing a massive vaccination campaign.

Chief Medical Officer in the Falklands. Dr Roger Diggle said the latest UK advice for travellers issued by the Foreign Office does not list Hepatitis A as a particular concern in Chile, however all of the world except the USA, Canada, western Europe, Australasia and Japan are Hepatitis A risk areas.

He explained, "Hepatitis A is caused by eating or drinking contaminated food or water. The risk in Chile is small provided one doesn't go to very rural areas where sanitation is poor. This in the tourist areas is minimal."

Dr Diggle added however. "If people are backpacking or roughing it, then they should be immunised against Hep A and possibly rabies as well. Ordinary tourists just need normal Falklands immunisations."

Immunisation for Hepititis A is one injection at an approximate cost of £20 from the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital.

Death of former FIT secretary


THE Falkland Islands Trust (FIT) has expressed sadness on the death of its former long-serving Administrative Secretary, Mrs Doris Dodson, and paid tribute to her dedication and efficient work for the Trust

She was recruited by FIT's founder chairman, General Nigel Gribbon in 1985, having formerly worked for the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

After 26 years' with FIT, she retired two years ago. The Trustees, headed by their chairman, Air Commodore Peter Johnson, and his two predecessors. General Gribbon and Captain Paddy Vincent, said a fond farewell to her at a special lunch in London.

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Pilot Squire retires

A FRONT-LINE pilot of the 1982 Falklands War who narrowly escaped death or injury several times on many dangerous missions has retired as head of the Royal Air Force.

Air Chief Marshal Sir Peter Squire, GCB, DFC, AFC, ADC, D.Sc. was the first front-line officer of the Falkland War to become professional head of one of the three armed services.

He led the Harrier attack on Dunnose Head air strip in which some buildings were destroyed and an Islander. Tim Miller, was blinded in one eye by shrappel. The two men were later to become friends. Peter Squire went back to the Falkland Islands as a tenth anniversary guest in 1992.

Air Chief Marshal Squire has been an effective and highly respected Chief of Air Staff for the past three years, and before that Commander in Chief of Strike Command and NATO Air Force Commander for North-West Europe.

It was a period of intense and challenging activity for the RAF carrying out many missions over Bosnia, Afghanistan, Iraq, and in the second Gulf War, as well as continuing to provide the front-line defence of the Falkland Islands and the air link to Brize Norton in the United Kingdom.

Perilous Falkland's missions

In 1982 Wing Commander Squire was commanding officer of the RAF's Number 1 Fighter Squadron of Harriers when it was hurriedly mobilised as part of the Falklands Task Force.

His squadron of ten Harriers flew a total of 151 sorties, two a day for each pilot, mainly ground attack and battlefield air interdiction, in dangerous low-level flying which took a heavy toll. Four of the Harriers were brought down, and another three damaged, leaving only three unscathed. They became the first RAF aircraft to operate from an aircraft carrier, HMS Hermes, since the Second World War.

Wing Commander Squire flew his Harrier off the cargo vessel, Atlantic Conveyor only a few days before she was sunk by an Argentine exocet missile. From then on, he was in the thick of the action, day after day, with no respite, attacking Stanley Airport and other Argentine targets.

In a pioneer mission, he became the first ever RAF pilot to launch a laser-guided "smart" bomb - attacking Argentine troops on Mount Longdon.

He had narrow escapes when he crash landed at Port San Carlos airstrip, and again just days before the war ended when a blowpipe missile exploded near his Harrier, and a bullet penetrated the cockpit, almost hitting him.

After the war, engine failure forced him to eject before his aircraft crashed into the sea off Cape Pembroke.

Wing Commander Squire kept a fascinating personal day-to-day diary of operations. His awards include a Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Force Cross.

Keep your animals healthy

THE Senior Veterinary Officer has offered his advice to Falklands pet owners on how to ensure their cats and dogs stay healthy.

Steve Pointing's tips are an attempt to highlight the problems he sees in the veterinary surgery as a result of poor dietary intake.

Cats and kittens

Mr Pointing says, contrary to popular belief, an all fresh meat diet for kittens is not as desirable as it may seem. He explained, "Young kittens are growing quickly and this includes the bones. It is important for healthy bone growth that the ratio of calcium and phosphorus is correct (about 1:1) whereas fresh meat has a much higher level of phosphorus than calcium.

"Over a period of time this can lead to demineralisation of bones and abnormalities in bone growth causing bones to become weak so that they may bend or fracture easily."

they may bend or fracture easily."
He added. "The best source of food for a growing kitten is its mother's milk but this usually has to be supplemented by the time the kitten reaches 4 or 5 weeks old. This depends on how quickly the kitten is growing, how much milk the mother has and how many kittens were born in the first place.

"Some form of milk supplementation should continue for the next two to three months – cows milk is usually fine but if it causes periods of diarrhoea then it may need to be watered down slightly."

Mr Pointing said it is important not to transfer a kitten immediately on to an all fresh meat diet. He said, "I am not here to advocate the virtues of commercial cat or dog food but at certain times in an animal's life they can be useful.

"Commercial pet food is scientifically formulated to meet the needs of the growing cat or dog and, even if you don't want to use it forever, it is probably a good idea to feed some of this to a young growing animal."

He answered the commonly held view that lion or cheetah cubs grow well without the aid of a commercial pet food saying, "This is true but they often remain with their mothers for much longer periods than do domestic kittens thus having access to milk during this time and when large cats eat their prey they eat everything (bones, guts, intestinal contents etc) and not just the flesh.

"This is also true for domestic cats when they catch a mouse or a bird especially if they are truly hun-

gry."

If owners wish to feed an all meat

diet to their cat when it is fully grown, Mr Pointing said, "...then this may not cause too many problems but I would urge you to consider feeding the meat in the form of small chunks rather than as mince.

"One of the most common conditions encountered in middle-aged cats (and sometimes quite young cats) is tooth disease and gingivitis. Much of this could be prevented if the cat was fed a better diet.

"It is important for dental cleanliness and gum health that a cat should have to chew its food. This is one of the main drawbacks of commercially prepared tinned food and feeding minced meat has a similar effect. Again I am not advocating commercially prepared diets but the occasional use of the dried biscuit type cat food is probably beneficial to dental hygiene.

"As any cat owner knows cats can be very fussy eaters. If you can encourage your cat to eat as wide a range of foods as possible when it is young then you will be doing both yourself and the cat a service. Once a cat develops a passion for only one type of food it can be very difficult to persuade it to eat anything else."

Dogs and Puppies

Much of what Mr Pointing advises about kittens would apply equally well to puppies and growing dogs. He added that however, in reality, in the Falkland Islands vets tend to see fewer problems with dogs than with cats. He explained, "This is probably because dogs have a much more catholic taste than cats and, given the opportunity, would eat anything

they could get hold of. It is still true, however, that puppies and growing dogs should be given a well balanced diet to meet all their needs."

anced diet to meet all their needs."

He continued, "Again these might best be met by the feeding of a commercially prepared diet but, if you want to make up a home produced diet, this should include milk and meat and a wide range of other foods such as bread, cooked vegetables, eggs (raw or cooked) and other kitchen scraps. Dogs, by nature, are opportunistic feeders and will eat a very wide range of different foodstuffs. They are not exclusively meat eaters."

Mr Pointing said the practice of feeding a shoulder or leg of mutton to farm dogs in the Falklands is not ideal as far as the dog's dietary needs are concerned. He said, "They would almost certainly benefit from a higher carbohydrate component and this could be supplied in the form of left-over bread, cooked vegetables or commercial dog biscuits.

"Even if these were fed on an occasional basis it would help to correct the nutritional imbalances that almost certainly occur on an exclu-

sively meat based diet.

"It is very noticeable, for example, when we have farm dogs in for extended periods recovering from surgery how much their coat condition improves during their period of convalescence. For convenience we feed a diet of tinned dog food and biscuits and it would appear that this type of diet is supplying the dog with nutrients that are lacking in a meat only diet.

"The improvement in coat con-

"The improvement in coat condition is something that can easily be seen and felt but is only a surface manifestation of improved condition throughout the whole body."

Mr Pointing added, "This is not supposed to be a comprehensive account of all aspects of feeding your

dog or cat.

IS THERE any employment protection for "seasonal workers"?

Crown Counsel, Ros Cheek commented, "The principal law in the Falkland Islands which provides some protection to employees is the Employment Protection Ordinance 1989.

'The protections offered by that Ordinance are subject to a number of exceptions and many provisions, for example those relating to maternity, redundancy and unfair dismissal, do not have effect unless the employee has been continuously employed in her/his job for a minimum period of two years.

"Therefore those parts of the Ordinance do not protect the 'seasonal worker' in contrast to more long term employment. The Ordinance also limits the protection offered to part time workers.

DO THE pedestrian crossings at the Junior school and Post Office enjoy the full protection of the law? Don't they require flashing beacons?

Ms Cheek again answered, "The Pedestrian Crossing Regulations provide that pedestrian crossings are to be indicated by the placing of specified markings and studs on the road. The regulatory studs have not yet been put in place.
"I am informed that the studs

have been ordered and will be put in place at the earliest opportunity.

The Regulations do allow for lights to be erected at a pedestrian crossing, but this is at the discretion of the Director of Public Works and the erection of lights or beacons are not required compulsorily.

"I would note that the incomplete implementation of the Regulations in terms of the placing of road studs do not prevent the crossings being used by pedestrians and that drivers are required to show the normal duty of care towards other road users in any event."

WE SEE a lot of reports of Inquests following deaths both in and out of the Islands. When is an Inquest needed and who pays for the costs of the pathologist to fly out of the Islands?

The Coroner, Nick Sanders, commented, "The law requires that I hold an Inquest on any body lying in the Falkland Islands where I have reasonable cause to suspect that the deceased has died a violent or unnatural death, or a sudden death of which the cause is unknown.

The purpose of the Inquest, which is an independent public inquiry into the death, is to answer four questions: who the deceased was, and how, when and where they died. The process is important because it is often the only chance that relatives have to question the circumstances in which a person

"As part of the investigation process, I am required to obtain a post-mortem report which provides me with the precise cause of death and any other background medical information on the deceased.

"As we do not have a pathologist on the Islands, we have established excellent links with the UK forensic pathologist service and a pathologist will usually visit within days of the death to complete the post-mortem and prepare a report.

"They do not usually charge for their time although there are occasions when additional investigations are required for which we

have to pay.
"These charges, and the costs of flights, are paid by the contractor or employing company for fishermen and visitors to the Islands, and out of the Coroner's budget where they cannot be recovered in this way. In the last financial year,

the total cost to FIG of this service was just over £1200."

IN A recent Gazette, the Immigration (Amendment) Bill proposes giving the Principal Im-

migration Officer the right to require jobs to be advertised before granting a work permit.

Doesn't he already have this power, and if so why is there a new law being introduced?

Principal Immigration Officer, Peter King, commented, "The requirement to advertise vacancies where jobs are held by temporary residents has formed part of immigration policy for many years and is undertaken to ensure employment opportunities for permanent residents of the Islands. The policy was confirmed by Executive Council as recently as April 2003 on the basis of paper 123/03 (available from Gilbert House).

A lawyer had challenged the advertising process stating that in his view it is unlawful. Whilst the Attorney General does not share that view, he proposed to Executive Council in June an amendment to the Immigration Ordinance which will, if passed by the Legislature in August, include the requirement to advertise in the immigration law thereby removing any element of doubt about its legality (see Executive Council paper 155/03, also available from Gilbert House)."

PN reports on Executive Council papers

Fisheries policy progress - rights for whom?

WHETHER or not ownership of long-term fishing rights should be open exclusively to Falkland Islands status holders is pending legal advice from the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

This is according to a paper updating councillors on the progress of the Fisheries Policy Review and implementation.

It notes that there will be two classes of right

 Long-term right to a share of a particular fishery, and,


•Short term right derived from the long-term right called the annual or seasonal harvest right.

The paper also notes that the original recommendation that rights should be long-term or permanent be modified to 20-25 years duration

Director of Fisheries John Barton explained to *Penguin News* that originally it was recommended that companies have rights, "...in perpetuity," but after further thought it was decided that a cut off point might be necessary after 20-25 years.

This would deal with a situation should things"...not be going as intended."

However, in turn, it is a likely that another paper will go to ExCo recommending that there be a review date after 10-15 years.



Mr Barton said, "...this review date would give FIG the option to further extend rights so that, for example, if a company has invested £10million into a vessel and a fish processing plant they won't necessarily have to face a countdown to an ending of their rights.

"There would, instead, be the opportunity to extend their rights on a rolling basis."

The paper also notes,

 each fishery will be treatd separately with their own management plan,

- there will be limits as to the maximum share which any company can have in a particular fishery.
- •there will be scope for interaction by FIG to ensure proper conservation and management,
- new policy must not have adverse impact on conservation or revenue,
- •fisheries ordinance is to be replaced with updated legislation (by the Attorney General).

Fraud paper

A PAPER that outlines how a member of the public can make a complaint against suspected 'financial malpractice' within the public sector has been adopted by government

Last week Executive Councillors were invited to adopt the Anti Fraud Policy and Procedure presented in a paper by the Deputy Financial Secretary Keith Padgett.

He says, "...the Government is a leading player in the Falkland Islands economy and has a significant impact on society. Therefore, it should ensure that its obligations in this area are publicly recognised."

The adoption of the policy is described as one element in this framework. It provides a public statement that the Government is committed to operating in an open and honest way.

"It is also intended to foster confidence that any potential areas of malpractice will be dealt with appropriately within a defined procedure," said Mr Padgett

The paper outlines steps which will be taken should any suspicions be reported and the responsibilities of affected individuals.

It notes that although the policy aims to encourage complainants to put their names to concerns and to take advantage of the protection afforded to them, attempts will be made to investigate anonymous concerns.

The paper says if a concern is raised in good faith but is not subsequently confirmed by an investigation no action will be taken against the individual who raised it.

If, however, an allegation is made frivolously, maliciously or for personal gain, knowing it to be untrue, disciplinary action and/or legal action will be taken.

Qualifying criteria based on 'effort history'

CURRENT Falkland Island participants in the fishery will benefit in the first instance from the allocation of fishing rights under the new fishery policy.

This is because the policy of who will be awarded rights will be based on the company's effort history (fishing power) in the fishery.

Remaining companies and new companies will have any additional effort made available to them, providing they meet the right criteria.

Executive Councillors accepted these recommendations last week.

They also agreed that,

- each major fishery should be treated separately for the purpose of the initial allocation of fishing rights;
- the basis for determining the allocation approach used in each fishery should be the amount of Falkland Islands investment in the fishery and the level of exploitation;
- inital rights are allocated to companies as fully transferable or non-tradable provisional rights depending on a company's proven level of active involvement in a fishery.

To qualify for the award of fishing rights (and to continue to hold them) a company will have to be

involved either in the harvesting, processing or selling of fish.

The company will also have to be in effective control, and make efficient use, of its rights holdings.

The new policy is aimed at allowing Falklands companies to hold fishing licences in the longer

term to give stability and continuity to the industry.

Background to the policy is laid out in an Executive Council paper prepared by Director of Fisheries John Barton and Economic Adviser Mike Harte.

Tax relief on fishing rights purchase



FISHING companies will receive tax relief on the purchase of fishing rights, confirmed Acting Commissioner of Taxation Andy Finch this week

Speaking of the Executive Council decision on charging for fishery rights he said, "When someone buys rights they will get tax relief on purchase but when they sell the sale proceeds will be taxed."

The latter will ensure that the Falkland Islands Government will

capture some of the value of the rights at the time of sale.

Mr Finch said, "Councillors were concerned that they were giving something valuable away, but this is a relatively simple way of solving that problem."

"Although fishery rights are currently capital items and therefore not taxable (we only tax income') they are to be 'deemed' revenue items which will bring them under income tax."

Tax report approved

EXECUTIVE Council have approved the final report on the new tax policy framework.

The policy was aimed at consistency, simplicity and transparency, said the Acting Commissioner of Taxation

ExCo first resolved in 2001 to simplify the tax framework. As a result a working group was formed made up of a councillor, government officials and members of the private sector.

In March 2003 it was agreed that the group's initial paper be released for public consultation. The group met again and discussed the responses and as a result some changes were made to the original proposals.

Last week ExCo agreed to adopt the measures and they will take effect from January 1, 2004.

FALKLANDS RESIDENTS are accustomed to finding a variety of flotsam washed ashore on the Islands' long coastline.

The origin of the items on our beaches, and the route they have taken prior to coming ashore, are seldom known in any great detail. In the rare cases where the history of an object is known we gain valuable insight into the ocean currents of our

On April 27 Peter Johnston discovered an unusual buoy (pictured right) washed ashore on a rocky beach on the south side of Hookers Point

An initial inspection suggested that this was an "oceanographic drifter" - a buoy released to drift with surface current and transmit oceanographic data back via satellite. Apart from having gained a mass of goose barnacles the buoy appeared to be in good condition. The obvious questions were who had released the buoy and where had it been en route to the

Some internet searching confirmed that the buoy was indeed an oceanographic "Lagrangian drifter", though apparently missing the sub-surface components: an instrument module and the large canvas drogue that prevents the buoy being unduly influenced by wind, so providing more representative data on surface cur-

The data transmitted by these buoys is shared among global oceanographic and meteorological organisations, and various maps showing buoy locations and tracks are available on the web. One such map showed a number of drifters active in the south-west Atlantic, including one



remarkably close to Stanley. This was identified as belonging to the United States National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA)

"We emailed pictures of the buoy to Craig Engler, manager of drifter operations at NOAA's Global Drifter Centre in Florida, who confirmed that the recovered buoy did indeed appear to be a World Ocean Circulation Experiment/Surface Velocity Program drifter. He noted that the Global Drifter Programme deploys 20 - 30 of this type of buoy in the South Atlantic each year.

"Very shortly after this we were contacted by Jeff Wingenroth from Technocean, the company that manufactures these oceanographic drifters for NOAA. As relatively few of these devices are every recovered after long periods at sea he was interested to have this example returned for examination, and arrangements for this are being made

Further information from NOAA

revealed that the buoy was released east of New Zealand on March 29, 2001, so had been at sea for over two years. The track (see map) shows that the buoy's eastwards progress was initially slow due to eddys in the western Pacific.

By the beginning of March this year the buoy had reached the eastern side of the Pacific and soon after it rounded Cape Horn and passed into the south-west Atlantic. The buoy lost its drogue (sea anchor) on April 22 about 20 miles south-west of Stanley and, with the aid of the wind, appears to have washed ashore soon

This type of drifting buoy conforms to the requirements of the World Ocean Circulation Experiment (WOCE) Surface Velocity Program. an international programme that ran through the 1990s.

The main purpose of the buoys is to track a parcel of water: the data is used to construct global maps of surface currents and seasonal variation in these currents, and can be used to validate models of ocean currents. A sea-surface temperature sensor and barometer on the buoys provide realtime data for weather forecasters. Surface circulation of the oceans is an important component of climate prediction models

A well travelled buoy What on earth is Biodiversity?

BIODIVERSITY is a well used term in the UK's Overseas Territories.' both locally and globally but what does it mean and what relevance does it have to the Falkland Islands?

Penguin News asked Andrew Douse, Conservation Strategy Officer for the Falkland Islands Gov-

Mr Douse explained, "Shortened from the words 'biological diversity'. the accepted view is that biodiversity encapsulates the variability among living organisms from whatever source (marine, fresh water or terrestrial environments) and includes diversity within typical species as well as diversity within species and between different environments.

"It is a widely held view that there is an enormous amount of 'redundancy' in biodiversity, the implication being that we can lose a few species or habitats and not have to worry about the consequences. Yet this view is increasingly seen as being a false and over optimistic assessment of the consequences of biodiversity loss as well as exhibiting the worst sort of complacency

Mr Douse said the world is going through a period of unprecedented biodiversity loss on a global scale, and the Falkland Islands are not immune from this, though it may not be happening as fast as it is elsewhere.

He explained, "Overall rates of decline are faster than they ever have been, even during periods of mass extinctions (in geological time) and the consequences of this biodiversity loss to society are largely unknown.

However, we depend to a very great extent on biodiversity not only for food, useful chemicals (including medicines) and other products, but also for 'environmental services' such as carbon storage (in peatlands), atmospheric and pollutant regulation as well as protection from processes such as erosion and habitat degradation Biodiversity loss has to be confronted and dealt, before the consequences (whatever they are) are irre-

Increasing recognition of the importance of this culminated in the 1992 Rio World Summit on biodiversity and its sustainable use. which led to the signing of the Convention on Biological Diversity

Mr Douse said, "The objectives of the CBD are the conservation of biological diversity, the sustainable use of its components, and the fair and equitable sharing of the benefits arising from commercial and other utilisation of genetic resources. The agreement covers all ecosystems. species, and genetic resources.

He added, "The recent World Summit on Sustainable Development in Johannesburg took the 'Rio' agenda

A principal outcome of the CBD on a further stage was a proposal that all signatories to the Convention should prepare national plans of action to conserve biodiversity. The process is well underway in many countries, such as the UK but is only just beginning

the UN 3 Overseas Territories.
Mr Douse said that, despite their size compared to the UK, there is more biodiversity in the remaining, more place assemblage of Overseas Territories than there is in the whole of the UK. "In recognition of this, the Foreign and Commonwealth Office has encouraged Overseas Territories to develop Environmental Charters which among other matters, addresses the conservation of biodiversity. Development of a Conservation Strategy is a commitment in The Falkland Islands Environmental Charter as well as the Islands Plan."

He continued, "The Falkland Islands is going through a period of rapid change, change that is essential for the development and maintenance of a sustainable community. Much of the Islands' economic strength lies in its abundant natural resources whether this is the land that provides forage for sheep and cattle, the seas that produce fish and squid or the wildlife that brings the tourists.

"We depend on these resources, and it is essential that these resources are managed sustainably if the economy is to remain viable. However the sustainability of these resources is not guaranteed, and while there are some factors that we have little control over (such as the consequences of global climate change) we can do much to ensure their sustainable management through adoption of wise use principles and a precautionary approach to new develop-

Mr Douse stressed however that a precautionary approach, "...is not a recipe for blocking development and should never be used as such, but it is an approach that allows for uncertainty in terms of unforeseen consequences and proceeds at a pace that does not endanger the very resources that the development may depend on

"A good example is aquaculture development, which has enormous potential in the islands, yet we know from other parts of the world that there are adverse environmental effects which, if unmanaged or unaccounted for could damage the product that is being produced and harm it's long term economic sustainability."

The project he is involved in is intended to produce a Conservation and Biodiversity Strategy for the Falkland Islands. This will happen over the next two years, and should therefore be in place in early 2005.

The strategy will cover a wide range of issues and will extend geographically into the marine environment as well as the onshore environ-

Mr Douse explained, "As well as traditional focus of conservation strategies and biodiversity action plans on particular species and habitats that are under threat (or have suffered serious declines in the past, such as tussac grass habitats), the strategy will encompass issues such as environmental assessment, the implementation of a number of interna



tional multilateral environmental agreements (such as the Agreement on the Conservation of Albatross & Petrels ACAP) as well as education. understanding and awareness raising.


"The strategy will be subject to wide consultation with government, business, the conservation sector and the wider Camp and Stanley comnunities

"We will do this through arranged meetings and discussions, articles in the press, public meetings and talks. In addition it is likely that there will be some form of public consultation on the draft Strategy though when this will be and in what form is uncertain at present.

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Notorious death squad leader arrested in Argentina

THE so-called 'angel of death', a notorious death squad leader who has become a sinister icon of Argentina's 1976-83 'dirty war' against leftists, was arrested on Friday pending possible extradition to Spain.

Former naval Captain Alfredo Astiz was one of 45 military officers ordered taken into custody in response to a request from a Spanish judge.

The arrest of Astiz coincided with Friday's decision by President Nestor Kirchner to revoke a 2001 decree banning the extradition of Argentines wanted by courts abroad for crimes against humanity.

Justice Minister Gustavo Beliz announced Kirchner's decision at a press conference as the president was en route back to Buenos Aires from an official visit to the United States. The head of state later signed the document revoking the decree upon his return to the capital

The abolition of the decree paves the way for the extradition of 45 military officers and one civilian indicted by Spanish Judge Baltasar Garzon on charges of mass murder, state terrorism and torture.

Kirchner decided to revoke the decree one day after Argentine Judge Rodolfo Canicoba Corral, acting on a request from Garzon, issued arrest warrants for those 46 individuals, all accused of taking

part in bloody repression during the 1976-83 dictatorship.

International arrest warrants were issued by French, Spanish and Italian judges against Astiz, nicknamed the 'angel of death' by dirty-war survivors for his fairhaired good looks.

The former navy officer is also wanted in Sweden for the kidnapping and disappearance of Swedish-born Dagmar Hagelin in January 1977.

Astiz was sentenced in absentia by a French court to life in prison for the kidnapping and disappearance of nuns Alice Domon and Leonie Duquet. In 2001, Italy requested his extradition in connection with the disappearance of three of its citizens, but was turned down

The former death squad leader has always been defiantly unapolo-

getic about the abuses committed by the military regime.

The defunct Argentine dictatorship is blamed for the abduction, torture and summary execution of between 15,000 and 30,000 people, real or imagined enemies of the regime. Some of the victims were either Spanish citizens or had a right, through a Spanish mother or father, to Spanish citizenship.

Garzon cites that as part of his reason for claiming jurisdiction in the cases. Kirchner also came out in favor of repealing two laws enacted in the 1980s that either granted amnesty or immunity from prosecution to military men aecused of rights violations.

Justice Minister Beliz said Friday that the decree annulled by Kirchner, signed at the end of 2001 by then-President Fernando de la Rua. "...was unsuitable because it violated both Argentine extradition laws and the bilateral treaty with Spain."

The decree, "...created a special status that was unacceptable under the rule of law," the minister said, adding that the Argentine government wants, "...the judiciary to act with independence."

In the words of Foreign Minister Rafael Bielsa, a respected constitutional lawyer, Kirchner decided, "....to return to a system that does not make distinctions among types of crime, and to the principle of equality before the law." MP

Premier resigns

THE premier of the oldest British colony, Bermuda, resigned on Monday, blaming the decision on a narrow victory in last week's elections and, "...friendly fire" from within her party.

Jennifer Smith, who quit as leader of the Progressive Labour Party on Sunday, will remain a member of Parliament.

Smith kept her parliament seat by only eight votes in last week's elections. Her party won a second term with 22 of 36 legislative seats in the elections, squeaking by with 51.65 percent of the vote.

The slim margin prompted five Cabinet members to withdraw their support for the premier on Friday. Half of the parliamentary bloc also turned against her.

"It was the stated aim of the opposition to put an end to the Smith government," she said at a news conference. "It is more unfortunate that friendly fire has taken out the Smith government."

Alex Scott, a former public relations manager who was elected to lead the Progressive Labour Party over the weekend, is expected to become the next premier.

Bermuda's premier is the top political post in the British terri-

While the British monarch is represented in Bermuda by a governor, the 1968 Constitution gave Bermuda internal self-government. Britain is responsible for military and foreign affairs.

General Practice - Back pain

BACK PAIN is one of the most common conditions there is - few people escape it.

Although fewer people do very heavy work than in years gone by, back pain is increasing. In fact, our sedentary modern lifestyle may be part of the problem. Factors at home and at work may lead to back injury.

Back pain and back injury at work is a problem of staggering proportions - it costs the UK economy something like 6 billion pounds a year. That is about £100 for every man, woman and child. This takes into account lost earnings for the individual, cost to the employer. compensation, insurance, and so on. If we could extrapolate to the Falklands (and I am sure we have just as much back trouble), we would be looking at £250,000 per year!

Most employed back pain sufferers get back to work fairly quickly, but the longer you are away from work, the less are your chances of returning. If you are off work for a year, your chances of ever returning to work are 1 in 4, which is pretty depressing.

Not surprisingly in view of these statistics, doctors, trade unions, employers and others have given a lot of thought to this problem A lot of progress has been made on the prevention and treatment of back pain.

Prevention of back strain when handling heavy loads is really about going back to basics, thinking about the task, and knowing a little bit about how to lift sensibly. It's difficult to say when a load is a heavy load, but surprisingly light loads can cause injury to fit strong people.

Twenty five kilograms for a man and sixteen kilograms for a woman is considered about the maximum safe limit. That's with the load close in to the body and relatively infrequent lifts - say 30 an hour.

Awkward loads, loads at arm's length, a rapid pace of work reduce the safe weight considerably. One should avoid bending the back when lifting. Bend at the knees keeping the back straight. Do not lift with the back in an awkward twisting posture.

Other preventative measures for those who are prone to back pain include:

Exercise - the aim is to give strength and suppleness to the supporting back muscles. Swimming is good but other regular back exercises will also help.

Posture - avoid standing or walking in a stooped position. Wherever possible, walk or stand with the shoulders and head slightly back

When sitting at a desk to work, make sure that the chair is at the right height for the desk and the feet should be able to rest flat on the floor with the knees bent at 90 degrees. Sleeping on a bed with a firm mattresses is best.

How does one treat back pain once it occurs?

Medical advice has changed over recent years. Exercise and 'keep going' is the key. In the past, advice had been to rest until the pain eases. It is now known that chronic (ongoing) back pain is more likely to develop in people who rest compared to people who keep on with normal activities.

The following advice is common for a sudden 'acute' episode of simple backache. Continue with normal activities as far as possible. This may not be possible at first if pain is severe but as soon as the pain eases, get back into normal activities. As a rule, anything that causes a lot of pain should be avoided but some discomfort may have to be accepted when trying to do normal activities.

Setting a new goal each day may be a good thing to try. For example, walking around the house on one day, a walk to the shops the next, etc. When the pain is easing, an exercise programme may help Sleep in the most naturally comfortable position.

After recovering from back pain, efforts should be made to prevent recurrences. If overweight, the extra stress on the back can be harmful and losing weight will help prevent recurrences. Be 'back aware' - it may not be so much heavy work that causes recurrences of back pain. More likely it is due to bad posture or bad lifting techniques at work or

What is simple backache and when might different treatment be needed?

About 19 in 20 backaches are classed as 'simple backache'. Typically, the pain is in one area of the lower back but sometimes it spreads to the buttocks or thighs. The cause is thought to be 'mechanical' in most cases such as a sprain or minor tear to a ligament or muscle.

Heavy lifting, an awkward twisting movement, prolonged or repeated bad posture may strain a back muscle or ligament. Minor problems with the discs between the vertebrae or the small 'facet' joints between the vertebra may also cause pain Often, the exact site and cause of the pain is not clear.

Sciatica occurs in less than 1 in 20 cases of backache. It is sometimes called a 'slipped disc' although

the disc does not actually 'slip'. What happens is that the disc bulges out and can press on nearby structures such as the sciatic nerve and cause pain. The sciatic nerve, which is the main nerve to the leg, is irritated or compressed ('trapped') where it comes out of the spinal cord. The irritated nerve causes pain to be felt along the course of the nerve even though the problem is in the back. Therefore, pain is felt down the leg to the calf or feet and is often worse than the back pain. The advice is much the same with sciatica though it may be more severe and take 6 weeks or more to resolve.

Back pain with any of the following symptoms may indicate a more serious problem and should be reported to a doctor: weakness of leg or feet muscles; problems with bladder or bowels; weight loss; pain that developed gradually - in particular if you have other conditions such as arthritis, AIDS, cancer or are taking steroids.

If simple back pain persists beyond 4-6 weeks, becomes worse or if symptoms change, the situation should be reviewed by a doctor.

Medication

Painkillers are often helpful. It is best to take painkillers regularly. This is better than taking them now and again just when the pain is very bad. Taking them regularly may prevent pain getting severe and enable exercise to be taken.

Paracetamol - taken regularly at full strength is often sufficient.

Anti-inflammatory painkillers - such as ibuprofen, diclofenac, naproxen, etc, may be stronger than paracetamol. However, some people get stomach problems with antiinflammatories. People with a history of peptic ulcer should not take these.

Codeine - alone or in combination with paracetamol, is a stronger painkiller. It may be an option if anti-inflammatories don't suit. Constipation is a common side effect from codeine and may make back pain worse if you need to strain to go to the toilet. Lots to drink and a high fibre diet will usually prevent constipation.

Muscle relaxants - are sometimes prescribed for a few days in addition to painkillers if the back muscles become tense and aggravate the pain.

Thanks to Emis Medical Information Systems and 'Guidance on the Manual Handling Regulations` (HSE). The latter is an excellent source of advice to employers on avoiding back problems in their workforce.

Mincemeat by Elizabeth Villalon

RECIPES are just about everywhere these days. You can scarcely buy a packet, jar or tin without a recipe leaping out to add an extra reason for purchasing it.

Ingredients

12oz soft brown sugar rind & juice of 1 lemon rind & juice of 1 orange Itsp mixed spice 1/2 tsp grated nutmeg

4oz brandy or rum

Method

- Mix & leave for 24hours. Add more liquid if necessary.
- This is best made 1 month in advance.
- Keeps well and makes 4lb



Patagonia is getting increasingly warm

PATAGONIA is undergoing the strongest warming process in four hundred years according to a report jointly produced by Argentine and Chilean scientists. and published in the latest edition of the Dutch magazine, Climatic Change.

The report entitled 'Long term climatic changes in the Southern Andes: variations in the 20th century in the context of the last 400 years' shows temperature patterns in north and south Patagonia since 1640 based on the growth rings of autochthonous trees particularly the Nothofagus Pumilio, locally known as lenga, which grow from northern Neuquen to Tierra del Fuego.

"Never before in the last four centuries have temperatures along the Southern Andes reached the current warming levels," said Ricardo Villalba an Argentine forestry expert with PhDs from the University of Colorado and Columbia University.

The report, part of the Patagon-1000 project financed by Argentina's Scientific Research and Promotion Agency, indicates that Patagonia's gradual warming has been most intense beginning in the mid 1970's with 1998, the. "...warmest in 400 years."

"We want to characterize the climatic variability in Argentina taking advantage of different vegetation evidence," explains Dr Villalba. Climatic records in Argentina and Chile only date back to a century and mostly concentrated in major cities where climatic signals suffer alterations because of urban warming.

Patagonia on the other hand is sparsely populated and has unique mountain ranges, glaciers and vegetation in an area that has hardly suffered human activity intrusion.

"The trees offer us continuous and precise information that normally extends for centuries, and even millenniums," said Dr Villalba adding that Patagonia has abundant 400/500 year old lengas, "...and some larch trees from before Christ's time."

"Each year generates a new growth ring, maybe one, two millimetres wide, clearly indicating prevailing climatic conditions: if the summer was cold, the ring is thinner and vice versa."

Argentine scientists extract five millimetre samples of tree trunks hearts with invaluable climatic and historic information from the successive rings, and, "...since they grow in cold weather these trees are particularly sensitive to temperature changes."

Dr Villalba said that the report includes research from locations with groups of thirty trees all along the Andes mountain range and."...we're now working with 3,700 samples."

Another area or research is charting the Patagonia ice mass and its constant retraction at different speeds.

Primary information from the Argentine Glaciology Department indicates that the Frias glacier in the Nahuel Huapi Park Tronador peak reached its maximum expansion during the last 2.000 years between 1640 and 1660. Since then and until

1850 it retracted at an annual rate of 2,5 metres. However between 1850 and 1890 it jumped to seven metres; between 1910 and 1940, 10 metres and 36 metres from 1976 to 1986

"Our camp work is showing that the contraction speed since 1986 has actually increased, in all Patagonian glaciers and this is proving consistent with temperature reconstruction." highlighted Dr Villalba.

AN EMPLOYEE working for the British company Standard Wool Chile and an outside accomplice have been charged with \$50,000US fraud according to the Punta Arenas press.

Long established in the Magallanes Region, Standard Wool Chile trades mainly with wool and skins


The modus operandi of the two men was quite simple and involved relatively small operations therefore it was only discovered several months after it was started. The unfaithful employee who had been working for the company for six years was responsible for payments to small suppliers and had mounted a scheme of bills of payments to nonexistent suppliers.

The outside accomplice, actually a bartender in a Punta Arenas night club, was paid a commission for the use of his bank account and cashing the checks.

The fraudulent payments occurred during most of 2002 and were only discovered last February while the employee was on annual leave and some of the bills did not correspond to registered suppliers.

On his return from holidays and aware of the internal investigation in the company, the unfaithful employee resigned and left for Santiago.

Charges were formally presented by Mr Dean Suyden from Standard Wool last March and local detectives flew to Santiago to arrest and bring back the accused.

Shortened year but pupils 'didn't suffer'

Penguin News investigates the effects of bringing the Falklands school year into line with the UK

AS the current school year draws to a close, headteachers have stated that pupils have not been disadvantaged by the shortened year.

The school year that began as usual in January, ran only until August rather than traditionally to December. This year it was truncated by one term to move the Falkland Islands school year into line with that of the UK.

School years will now run from September until August with pupils undertaking their GCSE examinations in May/June as in Britain.

Community School Headmaster Alan Purvis believes, "... the carefully planned," shortened year did not have a detrimental effect on pupils.

Mr Purvis says results of the Key Stage 3 SATS – English, Maths and Science tests taken by Year 9 in May - are higher than predicted by the Midyis Tests taken when the pupils were in Year 7.

Mr Purvis said, "We were really pleased with the SATS results that were marked externally in the UK they were higher than was predicted."

was predicted.
"We feel this confirms that the adjustments to the curriculum haven't meant children have suffered, and they have covered all they should have."

He said the current Year 10 (who will be the first year group to take their GCSEs having experienced the shortened year) are doing well. "... staff have no concerns about their progress."

He said, "Teachers have been working very hard to make this work, and I am pleased to say from our point of view that it has been successful and it is down to the staff."

Year 10 pupils Jody Poole, Krysteen Ormond, Gareth Tyldsley and Lee Williams were unanimous in their agreement their work was not disadvantaged as a result of the shortened year.

The group began their GCSE course in the latter part of Year 9 instead of at the beginning of Year 10

Krysteen Ormond said, "It

was a little difficult to settle in at first, working to a deadline, but it got easier.

Jody Poole agreed adding, "...we were given a lot of encouragement by our teachers to come through."

Asked whether they were concerned when they heard about the intention to adjust the year, they all agreed, "At the start it was really worrying but when we found out exactly what it was all about it was fine" the pupils did not miss out any essential parts of the curriculum in taking three terms work in two. And in talking to the Heads we believe this has been achieved.

"The secret was in the planning which began in 2002. It is not simply a case of it being OK to miss a term, it worked because the curriculum was carefully adjusted. We have had no complaints about children suffering as a result of the shortened year."

"At the start it was worrying but when we understood exactly what it invovled it was fine" Year 10 pupils

Infant/Junior School Headmaster John Farrow also expressed satisfaction with the situation.

He said, "I feel it has gone pretty well; it has been a lot of hard work, however, I don't think the children have suffered; but I think we will all enjoy next year more. The children performed to the level expected, we have targets and they reached that level."

Director of Education Sylvia Cole told *Penguin News* yesterday, "What we were aiming for was that Speaking of the GCSE groups she said, "Staff have had to keep an eye on them from the beginning. Because the current Year 10 started their GCSE course in Year 9 they have had a full complement of time. We won't know the results until June 2004, however, there is no evidence of anything having been omitted. Understandably there has been a great deal of concern but we are happy with the outcome."

The change to the year will mean that some pupils intending to

study overseas for A Levels starting September 2004 will be younger than usual.

Asked how the Education Department intends to deal with the concerns of parents of younger students, Mrs Cole said, "We've had some thoughts on that; in fact we just discussed it at a meeting of FICS managers. We have examined the possible problems and are looking to Peter Symonds and Chichester Colleges to provide extra support for younger pupils."

She commented, "Although we rarely have problems with our pupils overseas, even when we do it isn't necessarily with the younger age group anyway. But parents are understandably concerned: after all their children are going to be 8,000 miles away..."

Younger Year 10 pupils are unconcerned. Kyrsteen Ormond says she is pleased to be able to, "...get my studying out the way earlier."

Speaking generally about the decision to adjust the Falklands School Year to be in line with the UK year. Mrs Cole said, "People in education felt they had no choice in this matter...

"It broke a traditional pattern that people are comfortable with, but it didn't fit the route that our pupils follow and that is the UK route which works on a different time scale."

It was decided to adjust the school year because the availability of the British GCSE exams in November (when Falklands children traditionally take them) was rapidly decreasing.

It was decided that Falklands' children should instead take their exams in May/June in line with pupils in the UK.

A FEW weeks ago at a meeting of the Media Trust, I was entertained by a comment from one of the Trustees who remarked that if the universe was ruled by women it would be far better organised.

Not surprisingly I wasn't inclined to disagree not least because I was enjoying the valiant effort of the one male present, to arrange his initially slightly hurt expression into one of appropriately amused semi-agree-

As it happens, in terms of female orderliness she probably wasn't too far off the mark. After all would a world run by women have allowed Saddam Hussein to wander off back to rule his country after he messed up the first time?

Not a chance - he'd have been grounded for life and obliged on a daily basis to listen to a furious catalogue of his past crimes if he so much as forgot to take the rubbish out or fix the garage door.

But moving on - I recalled her words this week when I attended the meeting called by Councillors Birmingham and Cheek on the subject of good quality childcare in the Islands.

Compared to the blathering nonsense we journalists must occasionally endure at the variety of meetings we cover, it was refreshing to observe a group of people - comprising mainly women - prepared to put forward positive and largely practical ideas as opposed to simply sit back and heckle (and anyway, that's my job.)

And although I am aware that some of the ideas, such as those that might involve utilising school or hostel property for after school clubs or care for juniors, might generate some immediate resistance. I truly hope those in authority in such sectors, or any other that might be suggested, will at least attempt to listen with open minds.

Change isn't always a comfortable concept but it doesn't necessarily follow that there isn't a way to make it benefit everybody.

Quite apart from that side of things - and before I am accused of sexism - during the meeting I was particularly struck by a comment made by one of the male attendees.

He quite rightly pointed out that bearing in mind government is the largest employer in the Islands, and that a sizeable proportion of those employees are parents. FIG actually has a responsibility (ethically if not legally) to ensure there is good quality, safe childcare facilities available.

Plus, the Falklands needs its workforce. It is prudent in economic terms to ensure that all of those people who wish to work can do so, and that they are not constrained by a lack of confidence in childcare facilities.

He also noted. "... the need for childcare facilities is not going to go

away, it is going to increase ...

Now that may seem like stating the obvious, but unfortunately in the past it hasn't always been taken on board by a few of our elected representatives; likely as a result of an un-evolved outlook with regard to working mothers.

But I am sure we are all prepared to give them the benefit of the doubt. Once they are made clearly aware of the very sincere concerns about current childcare facilities, and the vital need to assist its development, I am certain remaining councillors will be as happy to contribute to a project with such apparent advantages in economic and social terms, as to others that might be deemed to display less certain potential benefits.

FIG childcare for the future?

TWO councillors are examining the possibility of government purchasing a house on Jersey Road to be used as a 'safe, affordable' childcare facility

Councillors John Birmingham and Jan Cheek outlined the idea at a meeting attended by nearly fifty people on Monday evening.

Councillor Birmingham emphasised that a great deal of work had already been undertaken in terms of investigating options for childcare, by Government Officer Anton Livermore and Social Work Department Team Leader Sara-Jane Rich.

However, he felt that 'officaldom' needed to be balanced with the thoughts of parents and current nursery propreitors before any further development could take place.

He suggested a group be formed by parents to examine the options available.

During the discussion it was suggested that as well as the need for improved nursery care for younger children, after school care was also needed for older juniors with working parents.

An after school club was suggested, and future Leisure Centre manager Steve Dent said this was something he intended to investigate when he took up his appoint-

One member of the public felt School Hostel facilities might be also be made available for junior childcare immediately after school. She felt this would not interfere with resident children because most preferred to be off Stanley House grounds until they were required to return.

She suggested that an independent individual could undertake the care role as a small business

With regard to the potential purchase of the house. Councillor Birmingham suggested it might be run as a Trust, and that Trust could employ one or both existing nursery proprietors.

Others suggested the two nurseries could continue as businesses working side by side within the newly available facilites.

At the end of the meeting a group was formed made up of a number of parents plus nursery business owners

After the meeting Councillor Cheek commented. "It seemed clear from the comments made at the meeting that one house would not be big enough for everybody and there is also the problem of getting children to school, thus one or both nurseries might continue anyway...

She commented, "...even with the two nurseries there is still an unsatisfied demand for childcare '

New group to seek new race course

THE Stanley Sports Association has set up a subcommittee to investigate options for a new race-

SSA Chairman Steve Vincent told Penguin News this week, "I'm pleased to say it was a very well attended meeting and there will be a sports this year."

He explained that one of the options being examined as a new racecourse is in the golf course area.

He said that because he is Captain of the Golf Club as well SSA Chairman it was decided there was a conflict of interests, thus the decision was made to set up a sub committee.

Steve said, "The committee is made up of Mike Summers, Ron

Also at the meeting. Steve Dent was elected Secretary and Alison Dodd once again accepted the role of Treasurer.

C&W makes Ron's life easier | Argentine eye on Falklands oil

VOICE recognition technology has made a difference to the life of Ron Turner, a resident at the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital in Stanley.

Ron has spent the past two weeks getting to grips with a voice activated system which enables him to operate his telephone and television all with the sound of his own voice.

The system was a gift from Cable and Wireless at the suggestion of staff member Bob McLeod

Bob ordered the product from a company in the UK, Rehab Tech, installed the equipment and helped Ron to learn to operate it

With a series of vocal commands he can turn his television on and off and change volume and channels

He can also use the telephone independently and no longer needs assistance from hospital staff to make

Ron described the system, which can also be used for other tasks such as turning lights on and off and opening and closing blinds, as, "...quite extraordinary

He said that previously when lying in bed watching television he would be forced to call for, "...an already busy nurse," to change the channel or alter the volume or to help him make a telephone call.

He added that the voice activated system forces him to keep an even temper: "It won't respond if I shout or use the wrong tone."

TWO councillors have reacted firmly but positively to comments from an ex Argentine Energy Secretary on Falklands oil.

Jorge Lapeña, a former Argentine Energy Secretary wrote in Monday's edition of Clarin newspaper, The prospect of a promising oil future for the Falklands has to be approached as likely and therefore must necessarily be included in ...the permanent and priority agenda of our sovereignty rights over the Islands

Falklands councillor Stephen Luxton, who holds the portfolio for Mineral Resources, commented, "It's good news that the Argentines share our optimism for the presence of hydrocarbons in Falkland Islands waters, but the main deposits falling in Falkland Islands jurisdiction are nothing to do with them.

Councillor John Birmingham said "It's interesting because previously Argentine authorities would not accept the possibility of finding oil in our area. This is just confirming what we already know."

According to Mr Lapeña, the sedimentary basins surrounding the Islands have a great hydrocarbons potential in significant quantities, involving possibly millions of dollars for years to come.

Mr Lapeña's approach in his article entitled 'Malvinas: let's look after the oil', seems very much in line with recent arguments from the new president Nestor Kirchner's administration policy, claiming that Falklanders enjoy enviable living standards with the income earned from fishing licences in disputed waters.

Mr Lapena then argues that the Falklands designated areas for hydrocarbons operations far exceed the Islands and are equivalent to 400,000 sq km, an area similar to the Argentine provinces of Chubut and Santa Cruz, or 50% more than the North Sea oil basin. Argentina's most productive hydrocarbons basin extending over three provinces has only 124,000 sq km, points out Mr

On the legal side, the former Energy Minister underlines that the oil licensing is ruled entirely by Falklands law and regulations, (not UK) and while all foreign companies are welcome, a specific discrimination exists towards Argentine investors who are limited to a 49% share and no Argentine operators.

As to how long term the Falklands licensing process is (and therefore interfering with any future sovereignty talks). Mr Lapeña states that the 1996 licences can reach 56 years (22 for exploration and 35 for exploitation), while the 'open door' farming 48 years.
If any of these undertakings is

successful and given the 50% share that belongs to the Falklands government, in a 100 million cubic metres oil deposit, Mr Lapeña speculates that this could represent over 7.5 billion US dollars, or 3.7 million US dollars per capita.

Therefore he says, "...in defence of national (Argentine) interests we must adopt the hypotheses of the likely existence of such wealth to sustain the claims over which by his-

tory we have full rights.
"The issue must then be part of the permanent and priority agenda for the recovery of our sovereignty rights.

Persistent thief ends up in prison

A PERSISTENT offender, who previously appeared before the court only last month, was sent to prison on Wednesday

Robert Karl Kiddle pleaded guilty to two counts of theft, despite receiving a twelve month probation order for theft in July

Prosecutor Graham Cripps said Mr Kiddle stole two separate amounts of money from his employer, Mrs Julie Člarke. She discovered the theft of £55 on July 31 and dismissed him from his job

When police visited Mr Kiddle regarding another matter. Mr Kiddle broke down and confessed to also stealing £100 from Mrs Clarke on July 29

Mr Kiddle said he took the £100 to pay off his debts and was sorry for the trouble he had caused.

The Senior Magistrate. Nick Sanders, read out a list of offences committed by Mr Kiddle in the past ten years, including two cases of burglary and two of theft.

He said that if the offences were considered individually they could be regarded as, "... opportunistic" how-ever. together they showed, "...pat-terned offending". He described Mr Kiddle as, "... light fingered".

Mr Sanders told Mr Kiddle that less than three weeks ago he had made it clear, in issuing a probation order, he was giving Mr Kiddle, ' chance to build a new life," but he had not taken it

For each theft he sentenced Mr Kiddle to two months imprisonment. The sentences will serve consecutively, meaning he will be in prison for four months.

July weather

Farmers hands up for abattoir

THE future of the abattoir has generated a high level of interest amongst the population.

A generous proportion of the community has now attended a series of meetings held around the 1slands to discuss the future of the Falkland Islands Meat Company. The tour culminated in a public meeting in Stanley on Tuesday.

In the past two weeks Falklands farmers Ben Berntsen, Phillip Miller and Riki Evans were accompanied by Julian Morris, General Manager FIDC, Connie Stevens Marketing Manager FIDC and John Ferguson, Planning and Maintenance Manager of the abattoir, to meet with farmers to discuss the first export season's results, the present situation and the future development of the Meat Industry

The meetings, held at Hope Cottage, Hill Cove, Fox Bay and Goose Green, each lasted for up to six hours, during which frank debate came after detailed presentations by the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) representatives.

Mrs Stevens commented, "At the end of each meeting, a list of options were considered, and the farming community made their views clear: that we should remain in the export market, whilst ensuring that all feasible options are explored and analysed fully - for example shipping and freight, joint venture opportunities, improvements to existing operation, sales links etc

"In addition, the local market should be developed, providing a consistent supply of quality meat and improving opportunities for all the farming community to supply stock of appropriate quality. There was much discussion regarding the difference that farmers can make to the project by focusing on the grad-ing, conformation and provision of livestock to both the local and export markets.

A working group of farmers has been formed, who will now be directly involved with the ongoing management and development of the Falkland Islands Meat Company.

Forty-seven farms were represented at the four meetings and Mrs Stevens said the overall conclusions were, "...unanimous: remain in the export market, develop the local market, improve and develop the existing operation, and consider all viable export opportunities including a joint venture operation."

Stanley meeting

Mr Morris also gave the abattoir presentation to a group of around fifty members of the public in the Court and Council Chamber on Tuesday evening. During the question and answer session the Chief Executive Chris Simpkins and Councillor Mike Summers responded to an enquiry about the Mount Pleasant market. Mr Simpkins explained that the Ministry of Defence (MoD) had a very demanding specification.

He said, "We are talking with the

MoD about supply and it might happen but not in the short term.

Councillor Summers explained that in the past they had experienced difficulties persuading the MoD to purchase locally grown vegetable but this had eventually been achieved. He said, "...it is possible to find a way to break into the system."

In response to a question on the availability of sheep for slaughter and the lack of sheep numbers in the Islands, Director of Agriculture Peter Johnston said, "Numbers of sheep are still falling." He said recent figures showed there were around 570.000 sheep in the Islands compared to, "...the 700,000 that used

He said, "But we are gearing towards meat production and this takes time. There is a high level of interest in dual purpose animals (wool and meat)... and a number of farmers have invested heavily just for this purpose.

Responding to a question on potential for profitability and how long councillors were prepared to subsidise FIMCo, Councillor Summers commented that the government was, "...creating a new industry," and he would be happy to see it subsidised for ten years, after which he would expect it to be making a contribution to the economy.

He commented that around £25 million has been put into setting up the fishing industry and £5 million or more into tourism.



West Falklands peat slip | Seven winters captured in book

FARMER Leon Berntsen was able to observe the affects of the forces of nature when he discovered a peat slip on Cape Meredith Hill last month

Mr Berntsen said the peat slip. which was 300 - 400m long, "...appeared to have been caused by a build up of water.

Cape Meredith is the southern most point on West Falklands.

The Falklands experienced a wet start to the winter. Although July was a dry month (see weather statistics on page 5), rainfall in June was well above average with 102.55mm against the average of 60.6mm.

The most dramatic peat slips in Falklands history occurred in Stanley over 100 years ago.

The first was in November 1878 and the second in June 1886. The second killed two people, a man and a child and damaged the exchange building and the clock tower. The old Church building completely collapsed.

DUTCH artist Jack Breed is to shortly publish a book of images captured while she travelled the wintery world.

The Journey of Seven Winters is the end result of an expedition of three and a half years in which Breed constantly lived in the winter. Seven times she sailed on merchant, container and fishing vessels back and forth between the northern and southern hemisphere so that she could remain in winter climes.

Breed spent her winters on isolated Antarctic and Arctic islands. where she built towers, painted. made installations and wrote a series of painted and illustrated books

She stayed on the Faeroe Islands, the Falklands. Iceland, South Africa, the Aleutian Islands, the Chatham Islands and Spitsbergen on the North Pole.

In the book, she tells us about the histories of the islands and the current circumstances of the islands

that she temporarily inhabited. She also explains her philosophy and motives to undertake such a grandiose project and goes on to lay out the artworks she created on the islands.

The book has a large format of 24 x 34cm and contains beautiful colour plates, stretched out seas, rugged landscapes and photos of Jack's inspiring artworks.

The famous ocean sailor Henk de Velde, who is now on the Aleutian Islands, has written the foreword of this splendid, full colour imitation leather bound book.

Esteban's film opens 'dirty war' debate

A NEW film about the Falklands War partially shot in the Islands which should be completed in a few weeks, has reopened a debate in Argentina about the country's recent history.

The script is from the book 'Enlightened by the Fire', written by a former Argentine conscript. Edgardo Esteban (40) who returned to the Islands for the first time in 1999 as a television journalist. In the book Mr Esteban depicts the tragedy of the Falklands' 'veteranos' who were, "...officially gagged," and, "...publicly gagged," shunned."

At the same time in Argentina President Nestor Kirchner has revoked a law, passed in 2001, which protected members of the Argentine military from extradition.

"Kirchner is trying to heal the wounds and build a more serious country, which it won't be until justice begins to function," remarks Mr Esteban.

But the President's critics fear that the historical debate could sap his administration and distract it from pressing economic and social issues.

Some believe, "There comes a point when you have to say, "...let's move on, though not forget."

The makers of `Enlightened by the Fire' disagree, "...if they killed your child, stole your grandchild or sent your son to die, cold and hungry, in trenches in the South Atlantic, you don't heal," remarked Mr Esteban. (MP)

Your Questions Answered

Ouestion: IF an individual takes the Falkland Islands Government to court, who pays the cost of bringing his/her counsel to the Islands and other related costs?

The following response was kindly provided by the Attorney General's Office with additional information from the Senior Magistrate

Answer: WITH any claim before the court the question of who pays depends on whether or not a person is successful, the conduct of the parties, and whether or not that person is legally aided.

It is likely (but not inevitable, since the courts have a wide discretion) that, if a person brings a successful claim against another, the

court will make an order for the unsuccessful person to pay some or all of the other party's legal

This may include the costs of barristers in appropriate cases. These costs are assessed by the Courts at the end of the case in a process called 'taxation of costs'.

Where a person is eligible for assistance with the costs of bringing or defending a case through the legal aid scheme, the scheme (which is funded by government but administered independently by the Courts) may meet all or part of the legal costs of the assisted person if that person has been unsuccessful in their case.

Again, this is subject to assessment at the end of the case.

A prickly crusade:

OVERGROWN gorse on Keppel Island has come under attack.

A group of seven volunteers (Rob Yssel, Sebastian Socodo, Darren Christie, Debbie Summers, Jeremy Poncet, Sam and Hay Miller), working on behalf of Historic Buildings with financial support from the owner Lionel Fell, headed out to the island on Monday, July 28 on a British International helicopter.

According to Debbie Summers, previously a member of the Historic Buildings Committee, the aim of the five-day trip was to get to grips with the gorse that is fast invading the settlement.

She said. "The Keppel settlement is historically extremely important to the Falkland Islands not just because of its use as a mission station during the mid to late 1800's but also for conservation reasons.

"The gorse was planted as hedging when the island was a sheep farm, and since the removal of livestock and full time residents fifteen years ago the gorse has flourished, growing up to the buildings themselves."

Ms Summers explained the gorse poses a, "...considerable fire risk to the area, forming channels by which fire can spread around

the whole settlement."

Using hard labour, a tractor and brute force, the group cut a large firebreak around buildings, and a large green exposed in front of the main house.

Ms Summers said, "The trip was a massive success, achieving much more than was hoped and, despite the difficulties of the work, all involved hugely enjoyed the trip.

trip.
"Many thanks to all those who made the trip possible in particular the Civil Military Liaison officer Major Mark Brennan, Raymond Evans, Jane Cameron (a logistical nightmare to organise) and to the Military and British International for their assistance in transporting the team."

She added. "It is hoped that in the future there will be individuals living on the island full time or at least during the summer season not just to greet visiting cruise vessels but to keep the settlement maintained in order to make it easier for vital Historic Buildings and conservation works to be carried out there.

"Also, and not least, to enable Falkland Islanders to visit this remote, wonderful island."

General Practice - Back pain by Trish Gardner, Pharmacist

What a pain! Pain killing medicines from the pharmacy

TYPES and severity of pain

Pain is a subjective sensation, which must be accepted by others as being whatever the sufferer says it is. There are many types of pain with a wide variety of causes. Some examples of pain include bone. nerve, cancer, after an operation (postoperative), childbirth, headache, joint, muscle and toothache. The degree of pain is usually roughly graded as being mild, moderate or severe.

This article discusses the over the counter painkillers (or analgesics, as they are medically known) which are effective for treating mild to moderate pain from muscles and joints, period pains, and headache.

Stronger painkillers for more severe pain can only be supplied on prescription from your doctor.

Paracetamol

The family favourite that you may know as one of its brand names - Panadol, Calpol or Disprol.

Paracetamol is effective as a general painkiller and also lowers fever. The Pharmacy at KEMH sells 500mg tablets and soluble 500mg tablets if one finds swallowing the tablets difficult, in 30 sized packs. For children, there is also a sugar-free (the dentists choice) banana-flavoured suspension, which can be used from three months upwards.

Ensure you read the directions carefully on the bottle, as children's doses are much less than adults. Please ask the Pharmacy staff for an oral syringe to help get the right amount of medicine into your little darlings' mouths!

Warning! It is essential, whatever your age, not take more than the recommended number of doses (=4 in 24 hours) and 4 hours shouldelapse between doses. Overdose can lead to serious liver damage. which can be life threatening.

Please be vigilant of preparations widely available which also contain Paracetamol e.g. all the Lemsip, Day and Night Nurse. Sinutab etc.

Co-Codamol

This is a combination product of full-dose Paracetamol plus a very small amount of a stronger painkiller called Codeine Phosphate. Whether this offers im-

proved pain relief compared to Paracetamol alone is open to debate. It carries the same maximum dosage warnings as Paracetamol but may also cause constipation and drowsiness due to the Codeine. Pharmacy sell these in packs of 30 dispersible tablets.

Anti inflammatory drugs and aspirin

These drugs have analgesic. anti-inflammatory and anti-fever properties. This explains why they are very useful for treating muscle and joint pain. Aspirin is no longer favoured for pain relief. since it commonly causes stomach irritation. Doses used for pain relief are much higher than those for thinning the blood and guidance below does NOT refer to Aspirin used to prevent blood clots by thinning the blood

On no account must Aspirin be used in children under the age of 16 years or whilst breast-feeding, because it can then cause a very serious condition called Reye's syn-

lbuprofen, you may know this as Nurofen/Brufen/Advil, is available over the counter at KEMH Pharmacy. This is effective for mild to moderate pain but a stronger anti-inflammatory agent may need to be prescribed if it does not provide relief. Although better tolerated than Aspirin, it can still cause stomach upset and should, like Aspirin, be taken with milk or food.

For adults, Ibuprofen is available as 200mg or 400mg tablets. You should not take more than 6 of the lower and 3 of the higher strength in any 24-hour period. Ibuprofen is safe to use in children as young as 6 months of age, provided they weigh at least 7 kg. and an orange-flavoured syrup is available to buy over the counter.

In addition to causing stomach problems. Ibuprofen and Aspirin can also cause deterioration in kidney and liver function and increased blood pressure. These side effects are more of a concern in people who already have kidney. liver or heart problems and the elderly, but it is still best for everyone to use the lowest, effective dose and not continue taking these medicines if they are no longer in pain.

It is advisable not to take two

anti-inflammatory drugs for pain relief at the same time.

In the elderly in particular, Paracetamol should be tried in the first instance.

These drugs should not be used at all in people who currently have stomach ulcers or have suffered from them in the past. A few people are hypersensitive to Aspirin, Ibuprofen and/or similar drugs only available on prescription, and this can result in a worsening of their breathing, a rash or nose congestion. Anyone with a documented allergy like this should not use these products.

These anti-inflammatory drugs interact with lots of other medicines and if you do take some prescribed medicines, it is best to check with Pharmacy or your Doctor that they are safe to mix together. You should only take these medicines during pregnancy and breast-feeding on your Doctor's advice.

Topical anti-inflammatory

preparations

These are alternatives to taking anti-inflammatory medicines by mouth. They may provide some slight relief of pain in muscle and joint conditions but are generally not as effective as taking similar medicines by mouth.

They are applied with a gentle massaging action (which could partly explain why they are quite popular!) to the area of pain but must not be used on inflamed/broken/cut or grazed skin. Avoid contact with eyes, nose, mouth, genital or anal areas.

The Pharmacy stocks a 30gramme gel called Feldene and a 100gramme cream called Movelat. Both of these are not advised for children under the age of 12 and are best avoided in pregnancy and breast-feeding. Both products can be applied up to four times a day but should not be excessively used. especially on very large areas e.g. the whole back.

Hands should be washed immediately after use and areas treated should not be covered with band-



GENERAL OVERVIEW

GREASY wool prices fell significantly during the first week of selling after the mid year recess.

Prices fell across the entire micron range, but falls were of a lower magnitude for lots with higher staple strength and good style.

According to the Wool Record Weekly price falls were attributable to low overall demand for wool and the absence of China from the market place. It was quoted that China is not expected to recommence strong buying activity until August/September.

British Quotations for Tops British top quotations reflected the greasy wool markets of the

world, with quotations falling for all micron categories.

Australian Market

In total 58.015 bales of wool were offered for sale during the week, with 45.889 bales purchased by the trade. Pass in rate averaged 20.9%.

Included in the offering were 4.625 bales of crossbred wool, of which 3.849 bales were sold. (pass in rate 16.5%).

New Zealand

Widespread buying interest was reported at last week's sale in Christchurch. Prices fell for most micron categories with both the fine and medium indicators down one or two percent

Auctions next week

52,000 bales are rostered for sale in Australia and 21,000 bales in New Zealand.

Strong shock in Argentine Antarctic base

A "TSUNAMI" or seismic wave caused by a 7.3 (Richter scale) earth-quake hit this week the Argentine Antarctic base of Orcadas (Orkneys) leaving broken window glass, fallen objects but fortunately no wounded or structural damages to the compound.

According to a release from the Argentine Antarctic Institute the full impact of the sea wave, "...was cushioned to great extent by the field of underwater ice, which is particularly extended at this time of the year".

"The seismic wave did not reach the height that is common with these huge water displacements because of the weight of the ice."

Apparently the earthquake that was located ten kilometres below sea level in the Scotia Sea and 71 kilometres east-northeast from the Ar-

gentine base, originated with an important vertical displacement in a fault.

Seismic equipment at the Orcadas base established the core of the movement at 60 degrees 55' latitude South and 43 degrees 49' West. The Argentine base is located at 60 degrees 7' and 33" South and 44 degrees, 7', 33" West.

A first seismic replica, close to the Scotia Sea mountain range was recorded almost eight hours later with a 5.4 magnitude, followed by a second but reaching 5.3 five hours

Regarding the situation after the tsunami and the after shocks, the Argentine Antarctic Institute said that staff is safe and sound. "...with no wounded, and with the seismic equipment operating normally."

Praise for Kirchner in UK media

ARGENTINA'S President Nestor Kirchner has been highly praised in the British Press for his swift, decisive, unexpected policies since taking office

An article in the prestigious Times Newspaper headlined "Super K plays a daring game with Argentine reform" says that instead of building his power base slowly and cautiously before tackling Argentina's problems, President Kirchner has moved swiftly against some of the most corrupt elements of Argentine society, taking on institutions and men the public thought were untouchable.

His targets so far include big business, Supreme Court judges tainted by their role in the corrupt rule of former President Menem, union bosses known as "the fat ones," and the police force.

The article, written by reporter Tom Hennigan, says that President Kirchner, using the element of surprise has caught his enemies off guard and left even his nominal allies struggling to keep up as he leads his popular campaign to end what he calls Argentina's. "... culture of impunity".

'Wash your hands' campaign in Chile

A MASSIVE educational campaign to prevent the spread of Hepatitis A outbreaks particularly in metropolitan Santiago de Chile was launched this week by the Chilean Ministry of Public Health and the city's environmental authorities.

The doubling of winter hepatitis cases in the country's capital, described by Chile's Medical College as an "epidemic", has caused widespread concern among the population and a controversy with doctors who favour a national vaccination campaign. "Everybody in action against hepatitis: the solution is in your hands," is the official motto of the full month radio and television campaign to emphasize personal hygiene with additional literature and pamphlets targeted to those groups and places considered "vulnerable" such as children, schools and the many deprived neighbourhoods without sewage surrounding Santiago.

Interviewed by a local broadcasting station Chilean Public Health Minister Pedro Garcia said that although children are most exposed to contagion, "and most cases are among children, risks extend to the whole population particularly to those who don't respect elementary hygiene practices."

"People must wash their hands, vegetables, and be especially careful with seafood." underlined Minister Garcia, adding that basic hygiene will help to, "...significantly minimize the risks of contracting hepatitis."

Santiago environmental health authorities said they will be distrib-

uting thousands of pamphlets in schools and poor areas of the city as well as in places with large concentration of people. Soledad Ubilla, Director of Met-

ropolitan Environmental Health indicated they will target the most vulnerable 250 schools of Santiago as well as reinforce inspections in restaurants, fast food outlets, dinning rooms of high schools and universities and severely sanction and close those places that don't follow sanitary recommendations." Howsanitary recommendations. ever Chilean sanitary officials insisted that vaccination, as has been the case since last year, will be limited to areas surrounding the outbreaks, and called on parents not to despair by attempting to purchase the hepatitis vaccine

"We call on people to keep calm, don't rush out to buy the vaccine, please act rationally and don't panic, it's much safer to keep to the recommendations than create an abnormally high prices market for the vaccine," stressed Minister Garcia.

The government's hepatitis policy has been questioned by Chile's Medical College, the Paediatrics Association, health workers unions and the pharmaceutical industry, all of whom favour a national vaccination campaign. Regarding Punta Arenas the situation seems under control. According to the local Epidemiological Service this year five cases have been reported, compared to 17 last year and the average 25 in the last few years.



Planned merge for FIG departments?

THE Mineral Resources and Agriculture Departments may eventually be merged, with Director of Mineral Resources Phyl Rendell as Head of Department.

He said staff have been advised of his plans and a formal announcement of any approved changes will be made after August 28

Argentine Presidential visit could be helpful believes FCO official

A VISIT to the Falklands by the Argentine President could benefit the Islands, believes British Foreign and Commonwealth Official Paul Davies*, but councillors appear less enthusiastic.

President Nestor Kirchner told Argentine press this week he. "...looked forward to attending the unveiling ceremony," of the Argentine Memorial at Darwin when it is completed.

Asked yesterday to comment on the President's words, Mr Davies, who visited the Islands this week, said. "If President Kirchner wants to visit, it would be an astonishing display for putting things behind

Mr Davies believes councillors should, "... think in terms of saying yes." He believes it could help the relationship between the Falklands and Argentina move on, but he added, "I think there are rather a few hurdles to overcome before we go down that route..."

Asked how the visit might benefit the Islands he said, "They are your nearest and biggest neighbour, and neighbours usually get on well. Neighbours usually work together to do things for each other's good; anything that could be translated into making that work for the Falklands would be worthwhile exploring."

But Councillor Roger Edwards said. "Personally I wouldn't want to see him here but to be quite honest I don't think he would come anyway. We've often heard of Argentine politicians intending to visit but it doesn't come to anything."

A statement from Gilbert House said on behalf of councillors, "...this is not the first time in recent weeks that similar statements have appeared in the Argentine press; there is no particular excitement, and no firm date yet for completion of the memorial."

President Kirchner has also stated that his administration will financially support the building of the memorial, and says erection is likely to begin next month and be completed within 120 days.

The Environmental Planning Office in the Falklands were surprised by the statement. Environmental Planning Officer Tony Lancaster said, "There has been no recent contact with our office, and we are not aware of a start occurring next month."

Argentine veterans are claiming in the press that the cost to the Argentine Families Association of building the memorial has been artificially inflated by Falklands officials through a special tax.

But Morrisons (Falklands) Ltd. Regional Manager Ken McKenzie said, "We gave a price based on information that they gave us for the construction and they said it was too expensive and could do it for half the price. But the engineer they sent down recognised the cost difference between the two countries in terms of cost of living and cost of construction.

"We are not being awkward, just being realistic with regard to undertaking such a project in the Falkland Islands.

"They also had the idea of doing the majority of the work in Argentina and Morrisons simply constructing it; that would substantially reduce my work. I said in principle there was no problem with that but it involves logistical difficulties when you have to ship large pieces of concrete covered with a finished material. But we are willing to talk it though and work towards a solution."

However, he confirmed that dialogue has been sparse recently. "We emailed the construction company on July 1 in respect of ground conditions and asked for instructions on how we should proceed, and we haven't heard anything since that day.

"As far as I am concerned we are as far forward as we can be until we get further instructions from Argentina."

Falklands network

The Falklands have a, "...variety of ex Governors scattered up and down South America," Paul Davies told *Penguin News*.

"You have got the former Director of the Americas and the Overseas Directorate in London, Dick Wilkinson, currently as Ambassador in Santiago: former Governor Richard Ralph is Ambassador in Lima. Peru and former Governor Donald Lamont is Ambassador in Caracas, Venezuela.

"All of them can work to try and inform their respective governments about what the Falklands is doing, how it is working and hopefully work together to encourage Falklands exports and Falklands participation in things around South America."

ALTHOUGH I rarely spend time pondering the relationship (or lack of) that exists between the Falkland Islands and Argentina, an isolated event this week revealed a line of thought that I might not otherwise have chanced upon.

The event was innocuous enough in itself, and involved a lady delivering a baby photograph to Penguin News to accompany a birthday greeting. It was no ordinary photograph though - it was in fact attached to

a'white card'.

For those unaware of the significance of that phrase, the white card was an Argentine issued document that allowed Falkland Islanders to pass through Argentina in the 1970's. For political reasons Argentine officialdom of the time refused to acknowledge Islanders' British issued passports.

The unexpected appearance of this surprisingly pristine document led me to think on the conversation I had had earlier in the week with artist

James Peck (see page 9).

James, who currently resides in Argentina, remarked wryly on his fury at a letter in the Buenos Aires Herald that referred to Islanders as unfriendly

and bitter towards Argentines.

He said he had written back to suggest that if Argentines just thought for a moment about their past actions they might be able to understand Islanders feelings. (Even more annoyingly his own letter had not been pub-

James went on to suggest that if there was some way of dealing with that lack of understanding of the Islanders' point of view it might be possible for the relationship to move on more positively

Fair enough; but is James just being an arty farty idealist, I wondered?

Well I'm not so sure.

No doubt both the majority of Islanders and Argentines would argue that the two points of view are so far apart that it is entirely pointless to attempt to pursue any promotion of understanding.

But is that a good enough reason not to try

Personally, I have long comprehended the feelings of wounded pride that generate Argentine passion for the Falklands

Like a great many other countries around the world Argentines still

view Britons as arrogant, imperialist, usurpers.

And Argentines do not perceive Islanders as we deserve, that is, as a people in our own right, but instead as a symbol of the original 'invaders' (as they would term it). I know this because Penguin News still frequently receives Argentine hate-email to that effect.

So what to do?

Do we extend our middle finger and cry "We won - you lost - nyah nyah," or do we instead publicise our maturity?

Do we take pro-active steps to show the Argentine people that we are not simply quasi-Englishmen clinging to imperialist residue, but a Falkland Island People who deserve our ownership of these Islands, not least for the time, work, sincere affection and loyalty we have awarded them?

With the aim of retaining the loyalty of the British public the Falkland Islands Government quite rightly spends money on public relations

exercises

Perhaps then for the future we should look to affecting the percep-

tion of the Argentine people too.

The advancement of the economy and democratic rights are justifiably treated as priorities by our government, but our foreign policy must surely evolve accordingly.

In Argentina the new President has taken the bold and admirable step of revoking a law that protects those murderers and torturers that character-

ised their 'dirty war'

As this situation progresses and the Argentine President revels in the accolades of the rest of the world, it may be opportune to show that we too have grown.



'Borrowed boat' means twilight row for Lowes

THREE young school girls heading home to their parents' farm for the end of term holiday were forced to row themselves across a river in the twilight last weekend.

Daughters of Lisa and Adrian Lowe of Murrell Farm, Lucinda, Sara and Katrina discovered at the end of their 40 minute overland walk to the Murrel River, that the rowing boat normally used by their parents to collect them had been 'borrowed' by an unknown person and left on the wrong side of the river.

With the tide high and the light failing, the girls, rather than walk back to Stanley in the dark, rowed themselves across the wide stretch of river to their concerned parents.

Lisa told Penguin News this week, "The girls come home from school at the end of term and on most weekends in the summer - not so much in the winter. They are given a lift to Moody Brook and then they walk the two miles to the river."

There is no road to the Murrell Farm and the soft peaty track is almost impassable in the winter. It can take well over an hour to traverse the two miles using two landrovers.

Adrian commented, "It might have been a bit of fun to someone to borrow our boat but it might have caused a nasty accident. If we had to get to Stanley in a hurry this is our only means when the tide is high the boat is our life line.

He added, "In terms of a road the government said seven years ago that we would have a road by 2003, but since then it has been excuse after excuse and there's still no road...

Penguin News asked Councillor Stephen Luxton, who retains the Transport portfolio, why a road has not been built to the Murrell Farm

Councillor Luxton said, "At the moment there is no firm technical solution or costing for the Murrell road which is why it has not been started. There are considerable difficulties with the material in the area which is not very suitable for road construction, as well as issues surrounding the river crossing.

The cost of hauling the required amount of stone from Pony's Pass to build the whole road would be prohibitive, as well as causing a huge amount of damage to the roads through town. The Public Works Department are currently working on a paper for a future meeting of Transport Advisory Committee (TAC) listing the available options and costings for linking the Murrell to the road network.

"In the meantime myself as Chair of the TAC and the Economic Adviser have met with the Lowes and we are working on other transport solutions for the Murrell in the short term. Something will be put to the next meeting of TAC which is at the end of this month.

THE Fisheries Committee is to discuss, "... the need for proper controls to help avoid accidents at FIPASS," Councillor Richard Cockwell has confirmed after a collision between a fishing vessel and the floating port last weekend.

As it was leaving FIPASS at 2.40pm on Saturday, August 9, the John Cheek, a Falklands registered vessel owned by Fortuna I.td, lost power and was pushed by the wind against the port.

The vessel collided with the south west barge of FIPASS which houses the wool warehouse

According to Marine Officer Jon Clark, the impact, "... damaged the framing and plating of the northwest corner of the warehouse

Power was restored on the vessel and it went astern then returned to berth at FIPASS.

Following an investigation and survey by divers it was confirmed that the vessel had sustained only superficial damage and the John Cheek departed for the fishing grounds the next day.

Mr Clark said it will take two to three weeks to determine the extent of the damage to the warehouse

Asked whether measures to prevent such incidents at FIPASS were being considered by the Fisheries Committee. Councillor Cockwell commented, "I am always concerned that FIPASS - being a floating facility - is extremely vulnerable to damage from vessels colliding with the barges.

'Recent incidents again raise the need for proper controls to help avoid accidents. This week I have had discussions with Jon Clark where we reviewed various possibilities to reduce the risks.

I shall be raising the matter at the next Fisheries Advisory Committee in September.

Two Twin Otter aircraft (VP-FAZ and VP-FBB) accompanied the Dash-7 to the Islands, for use as back up for the Antarctic opera-

Director of Civil Aviation. Andrew Newman, said that once





COULD Stanley face a water shortage in the coming summer if the mild winter we're currently experiencing continues?

Following reports of extremely warm weather conditions experienced in the northern hemisphere and the mild winter so far in the Falklands. Penguin News asked the Director of Public Works, Mike Forrest, if his department was taking any action to prevent a possible water shortage in the coming summer.

Mr Forrest commented. "Whilst temperatures have been mild, the water supply is dependent on rainfall.

"The rainfall in June was 102.5mm against an average of 60.6mm and in July 26.6mm compared with an average of 44.7mm.

"It is not possible to draw any conclusions from these figures regarding likely water availability in the summer. The figures for July through September will be of more interest to us.

Addressing dry conditions experienced in the Falklands in the 2001/2002 summer. Mr Forrest said a water shortage had not been experienced then. He commented,

supply was just in balance with demand for a period of about six weeks.

"It would be normal in the event of a water shortage to impose restrictions for example a ban on the use of hosepipes, and there was no such ban."

Water supply was the subject of a question for oral answer at a Legislative Council meeting held carlier this year when Councillor John Birmingham enquired whether there were any moves to improve the holding capacity at Moody Brook Reservoir.

The answer provided stated, "There is funding in the Capital Estimates in the sum of £15,000 for an option study and design of an alternative water supply scheme for Stanley.3

Options listed for investigation include:

- 1.Extraction from another source, most likely the Murrel River:
- Formation of additional storage capacity at a higher level in Moody Valley:
- 3. Formation of additional storage capacity near the existing impound.

This option study and the design are to be undertaken during the current financial year i.e. by June. 30, 2004

Mr Forrest added, "The timing for construction of the works identified by the option study has yet to be set within the Capital Programme.

Our latest analysis predicts that the situation experienced two years ago will occur once every five years.

Not guilty plea in sex case


A TWENTY-NINE year old man charged with having unlawful sex with a minor has pleaded not guilty.

Your questions answered

IS IT legal for the abattoir to continue killing when there is no experienced slaughterman/ woman for this EU abattoir?

Falkland Islands Development Corporation Marketing Manager, Connie Stevens, responded, "The abattoir is currently operating within the requirements of the Falkland Islands.

'We currently do have experienced staff handling the slaughtering of animals at the abattoir for the local market only.

"During the 'export' season, a much larger team would be required, including a full-time Veterinary Officer, Meat Inspector and a number of staff who have the relevant skills, qualifications and experience for their respective roles."

Senior Veterinary Officer, Steve Pointing added. "There are no specific requirements for an experienced slaughterman/woman to be present when killing for domestic consumption.

"I would, however, say that there are staff currently at the abattoir that do have quite a lot of experience of slaughtering animals."

IS THE abattoir going to bring down an experienced manager to run it for this season?

Mrs Stevens answered, "The team of people involved at the abattoir during the first 'export' season all made a significant contribution to the successful exportation of meat to a professional EU stan-

"To have direct input from an individual or individuals with relevant meat trade experience in the production and exportation of frozen mutton to a world-wide market, would be hugely advantageous. and is clearly a serious consideration for the Falkland Islands Meat Company.

GOVERNMENT has stated that it intends to tax the mid-contract flight entitlement of contract officers when used to go on holi-

Is this fair when there appears no intention to also tax the holiday credit scheme as unearned income?

A spokesperson from the Legislative Councillors Office said, "Payments of contract officers passages for mid-term leave is part of the employment package, to enable people working overseas to return to their home and family.

"If this is not taken, but instead used to pay for a holiday elsewhere, that then becomes a benefit in kind and is taxable. In the same way if any other employer pays for the holiday flights of its employees, that too is a benefit in kind and is taxable.

"Holiday credits do not relate to employment. They cannot therefore be treated as benefit in

"They are in effect a "social dividend" paid by the Government to eligible persons. To tax them would be to diminish their value by taking back a part of that payment. That would not make sense.

I SENT an anonymous letter to Penguin News two weeks ago but it wasn't published. Why not?

Managing Editor Lisa Riddell responded, "As clearly stated on page 7 (letters page), Penguin News cannot accept unsigned or anonymous letters, however we are happy to publish name and address withheld letters.

"It is an important policy to use in a small community such as ours, and can be used to prevent misuse of the paper, eg, as a tool with which to conduct a personal vendetta."

Democracy a source of pride or does FIG require a `refresher'?

THE openness of FIG Legislative body should be a source of pride.

Every month, councillors host a meeting which any member of the public can attend and ask any question they wish to. Letters and emails are answered personally within a few days and phone calls to Gilbert House or even Councillors' own homes are dealt with promptly. Democracy doesn't come much more direct than that.

Despite this openness, recent events have demonstrated that there is some suspicion surrounding the way resources are allocated. This suspicion may be completely unjustified but unless the work of Government is opened to scrutiny, it will remain.

When Foreign and Commonwealth Office researchers, Social Development Direct detected a lack of trust in the process of decision making they suggested, "... a greater degree of transparency may be needed "1" The Government needs to take up the challenge of transparency in order to restore public confidence.

Maurice Frankel of the Campaign for Freedom of Information writes, "The suspicions expressed about official motives may often be misplaced. Those who feel the wrong decision has been reached are often too quick to attribute bad faith to decision-makers.

"Greater openness may reveal that decisions were more complex than they had assumed; that officials had conscientiously explored the alternatives, and that there were sound reasons for the eventual decision. Such insights can enhance the public's confidence in the work of government, a factor often in short supply. Moreover, policies

which have been discussed openly at each stage are likely to command greater public acceptance."²

Government Secretary Pete King is keen to improve the dissemination of information and is researching the viability of a website where Government papers, committee agendas and minutes and other business can be posted. "We have it firmly in mind to improve things."

He adds "Perhaps a website of committee information would be a driver of consistency and availability, and save time in the long run. But there are obviously technical, design, management and cost issues to be considered."

Some people say that transparency is already established and that information is there but the public isn't interested.

Councillor Stephen Luxton would welcome greater public scrutiny. "I must say I am regularly disappointed to be sitting in meetings where there can be some weighty issues under discussion, but nobody is there for the open session (press or public).

"The joint FIDB/SFC meeting the other day was unusually populated, I think there were three whole people there!"

Part of this may be because committees work when others work, and time off during the day is difficult even for the most hardened activist. However this can be no more than a partial explanation as the Councillors' 5 o'clock public meeting is rarely attended by more than 30.

It is often claimed that the ef-

fort required to attend a committee meeting is rewarded by being excluded after a very short time. Eric Goss recalls four minutes once at FLH and 10 minutes at a Housing Committee. Clearly personal information must be protected but are the Chairs of these committees too quick to exclude the press and public?

The Committees (Access to Information) Ordinance 2000 is very specific about what is classified as Schedule 2 Exempt Information. This includes discussions of a particular employee, candidate, (anonymous) patient or student; buying or selling property or goods or services; legal proceedings, criminal investigations and labour relations

Crown Counsel Rosalind Cheek says "The nature of the exemption being made under Schedule 2 should be stated in the resolution by reference to a part and paragraph of Schedule 2". In other words, the Chair must give precise reasons for excluding the public by identifying which Schedule 2 category each exempt agenda item falls under.

If you are unable to attend a meeting, the agenda and minutes are available on request from Lynn Brownlee at the Secretariat. Most departments supply these by email and some even keep a mailing list so that interested people can receive agendas of forthcoming meetings automatically.

After the meeting, minutes should be available within five days. Minutes of the meeting from which the public and press were excluded should also be available, although any, "...exempt information," such as particular details identifying employees, students and patients are of course deleted. In the very rare case where so much of the record has been deleted that it doesn't make sense, a summary must be provided.

What should you do if you

want to appeal against a decision to close a meeting to the public? Maurice Frankel gives the following options:

1. Before a meeting has taken place, invite the "Proper Officer" (normally the Chief Executive for most committees) to reconsider the decision that discussion of the agenda item will be likely to involve disclosure of exempt information.

Before the meeting, ask the Chair of the meeting not to move the resolution excluding the press and public from the discussions of the item.

For either of these, you need to have some reasonable grounds for questioning the assertion that exempt information is involved. This is bound to be difficult, as you would usually not know what the information in question is since this has of course been withheld from you.

3. After the meeting you could make a formal complaint or consider the possibility of judicial review – though the costs of the latter usually rule this out for most people.

"However," adds Mr Frankel,
"None of these mechanisms is a
very effective safeguard against the
suspicion that the exemptions may
have been misapplied, to avoid dis-

closing embarrassing but non-exempt bits of the material." FIG Chief Executive Chris

FIG Chief Executive Chris Simpkins says "Clearly if the Access to Information Ordinance is not being interpreted correctly or applied correctly, that would probably amount to maladministration."

He adds "I am satisfied that there is absolutely no intention to deny people access to information but what has happened is that things have just slipped and it's time for a refresher."

He plans to prepare some detailed guidance and training for civil servants, refresher training for councillors and guidance for the public outlining what they can expect and what they are entitled to.

He and his Government colleagues have been discussing how to promote scrutiny. Executive Council will be discussing the principle of appointing an Ombudsman or Complaints Commissioner at its next meeting. Part of the role of a Commissioner would be to investigate claims of maladministration.

If approved, an appointment is unlikely to be made during this financial year, although it is possible that provision will be made next year.

Where am I from she asks. I get so tired of answering that question. Sometimes I say I am from Russia and I am here selling guns.

"I don't remember," I said.
She laughed. "How can you paint about life if you don't remember where you are from?" she said.

Then a younger guy comes in. "You know whose Islands they

are," he says.
"You know, You know."
"I know," I said, "They are

Then I told him to f**k off, which he did.


He joked, "...perhaps it is all in my head. I'm not sure. But it's not going to go away for a bit that's for



Busy August meeting for Planning and Building Committee

THERE were few contentious issue discussed at this meeting of the Planning and Building Committee, but this was to be, as usual. a busy meeting lasting (in the open session) a little more than one hour and ten minutes.

The chairman was the Honourable Richard Cockwell, and members were the Honourable Norma Edwards, Les Harris, Paul Phillips and Mike McLeod.

Brian Summers had not yet returned from overseas so apologies from himself and new member Mike Harris were recorded as were a small number of declarations of

One member of the public attended in addition to the writer, and Ms Jane Cameron, the Government Archivist, joined in the discussion on one item which concerned the Historic Buildings Committee when it arose.

There were twenty-two applications before the Committee seeking planning permission and as is

customary these were led by those deferred at earlier meetings and for renewal of former consents

Government's application for permission in principle (outline application) to erect a dwelling on land south of 94 Davis Street was now approved, the issue over access to the existing house from Eliza Crescent now having been resolved. Malcolm Ashworth's application to erect a dwelling on Plots 10 and 12 on the MPA Road had to be deferred again as the further information needed was still not to hand.

No less than seven renewals were then considered, the first of which, for the hobby rooms at the YMCA at 26 Shackleton Drive, received permanent planning permission as did the "park home" accommodating seasonal staff at the Market Garden.

Temporary consents renewed for further periods of time included the Portakabin used as a prison workshop and store at Police Headquarters on Ross Road; two containers used for storage by Byron Marine Limited at Plot 33 Lookout Industrial Estate; the mussel farm for Falklands Fresh Limited located between Darwin and Goose Green; one container used for storage at Villiers Street by Terence Phillips; and finally, the container also used for storage by Kelper Stores Limited adjacent to the Beaver Hangar on Ross Road West.

New applications

The Committee then began the review of new submissions and gave planning permission, the majority with conditions attached, to the following: a double garage for David McLeod at 49 Callaghan Road; a small extension and other works to her dwelling at 4 Murray Heights for Carla Francis; the relocation of his earlier approved garage for Gerald Cheek at 9 Biggs Road; Malcolm Jackson's change of use from an upholstery workshop to a granary at 23 Fitzroy Road, Tony and June McMullen's application for permanent consent for the mobile home situated at 6A John Street.

Also approved was a proposal to change the use of the shop known as The Toolbox on Davis Street East to two dwellings by Richard Short.

An extension to his house at 5 James Street for Steven Jaffray was approved, plus the display of a directional sign at the west entrance to Lookout Industrial Estate for Kelper Stores Limited; a garage for Mike Floyd (Snr) at 7 Pitaluga Place and a warehouse on their aerial site adjacent to Dairy Paddock Road for KTV Limited (this was the subject of a letter of objection which did not dissuade members from accepting the recommendation for approval).

They also approved a change of use from staff accommodation and guest accommodation to use as mixed accommodation at their Island lodge for Sea Lion Island Limited; and Nick and Jo's proposal to extend their dwelling and carry out internal works at 11 McKay Close.

When considering the Gift Shop Limited's application for approval to extend the east end of the porch of their premises at the Harbour Gift Shop at 34 Ross Road, members voiced concerns at the appearance also took note of a letter received from the Historic Buildings Committee and decided it should be deferred to allow discussions to

take place in order to obtain improvements in the design.

The Building Adviser (Jim Robison) then reported on the several building permits he had issued since the last meeting - these totalled seven with two further applications still on hold from earlier meetings where he was awaiting more information.

This was followed by Antony Lancaster (the Environmental Planning Officer) advising members on cases where, under the powers delegated to him, he had granted planning permission. These were in respect of the aerial mast at Reflections on Dean Street and the extension to Stanley Electrical's premises also on Dean Street

Next on the agenda was John Thain's application for an offstreet parking grant for works at 8 Davis Street, forming the driveway to his recently erected garage off Brisbane Road which the Committee were pleased to approve.

This was followed by a report on progress with the Development Plan and it was decided that the Hon Richard Cockwell, Antony Lancaster and Les Harris would represent the Committee in a discussion to be broadcast on FIBS next month which, it was agreed, was not to be a phone-in

There is also to be a discussion on the topic in the Town Hall which will be held in September and probably at the time and date of the Councillors' meeting.

Jane Cameron then joined members in the discussion on those buildings which it is proposed to list as Buildings of Special Architectural or Historic Interest: 4 Drury Street, 21 Fitzroy Road, 14 Pioneer Row, Mount Rosalie Dip. Shallow Bay Old House, and the Cape Meredith Shanty.

It was unanimously agreed that these be proceeded with and a report submitted to Executive Council, also that a number of other buildings be similarly considered in the future such as the Green Patch Dip and at North Arm.

The last items on the agenda dealt with the relaxation of building regulations procedure and the changes proposed to the Planning Ordinance as set out in the Planning (Amendment) Bill 2003, but members were in agreement that the discussion should take place at a separate meeting, such was the depth of detail included in the attached papers, and provisionally decided to hold this on Monday 25th August at 1.30pm with the presence of the Attorney General to assist them.

The next regular meeting of the Committee is scheduled to be held on Thursday September 4 in the Liberation Room and starting at

You and your skin with Penguin News

THE end of winter is (hopefully) approaching and it's likely that over the past months your skin has suffered cold, sometimes drier air.

Most of us (in particular women) have taken good care of our skin, but if you haven't here are a few tips to prepare it for the better weather.

Limit your baths or showers to about five minutes and use lukewarm water.

· Use non-drying, non-deodorant soap and use it sparingly.

Use moisturiser daily (that goes for men to). Apply the moisturiser to damp skin after your shower or have a bath. That will trap moisture in the skin and provide you with a protective barrier from the cold, dry air.

Don't wear wool clothing next to your skin. Wool can irritate skin during cold weather. Wear cotton shirts and long underwear beneath

any wool clothing.
You can add moisture to the air in your home or office by using a humidifier or by placing plenty of plants in your living and

workspaces. Another way to add moisture is to place pans of water on top of radiators.

Lip balms seal moisture into lins and prevent and repair chapping. Look for lip balms with ingredients such as petrolatum, dimethicone and semethicone. When doing any kind of outdoor activity, for example, walking, running or even gathering sheep, use a lip balm that contains sunscreen.

Ageing Skin Perhaps part of the problem you're suffering is simply the effects of time. Ageing skin is an inevitable part of growing older. However, certain factors can minimise the appearance of blotchy

skin, age spots, and wrinkles. Here's what you can do:

Limit the amount of alcohol you consume.

Quit smoking

Avoid crash or yo-yo diets.

Manage your stress. Get regular exercise.

· Avoid harsh skin products.

Get enough rest.

· Use sunscreen.

· Stay away from sun-beds

Drink plenty of water.

· When outdoors, wear a widebrimmed hat.

Dry eyed, dry skinned traveller

Finally, many of you may be ending the winter with a trip abroad, so here's some tips for the dryeyed dry-skinned traveller.

Aeroplane travel often leaves your skin and eyes feeling dry. This is because the humidity in an aircraft cabin is usually less than 20 percent, says the Aerospace Medical Association.

The dry air may cause you some discomfort, but there is little risk to your health.

Here's what you can do to minimise the dryness:

Drink reasonable amounts of water and juices.

Limit your consumption of alcohol, tea, coffee and caffeinated drinks. They cause you to lose flu-

Recipes for the Falklands - a Mexican flavour

Carne Guisada

A TRADITIONAL Tex-Mex dish featuring beef and gravy.

Serve over mashed potatoes or in tacos or flour tortillas.

Ingredients

1/2 tablespoon butter 1 1/2 pounds cubed stew meat 1 onion, chopped 1 (14.5 ounce) can stewed toma-

2 fresh jalapeno chile peppers,

seeded and diced 2 chopped tomatoes 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin I clove garlic, minced salt and pepper to taste water as needed

Directions

Melt the butter in a large saucepan over medium high heat.

Add the meat and brown well on all sides.

Add the onions and saute for 5 minutes, or until tender.

Add the canned tomatoes, jalapeno chile peppers, fresh tomatoes, cumin, garlic, and salt and pepper to taste.

Reduce heat to low, cover and simmer for 30 minutes to 1 hour, or until meat is tender.

(Note: If mixture is too thick, add water as needed.

Or if mixture is too thin, combine some comstarch and water and add to thicken.)

Apple Enchiladas

APPLES rolled in flour tortillas delicious, easy and fast to make.

Substitute apples with peaches or cherries if desired.

Ingredients

I (Ž1 ounce) can apple pie filling

6 (8 inch) flour tortillas I teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/3 cup margarine 1/2 cup white sugar 1/2 cup packed brown sugar 1/2 cup water

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).

Spoon fruit evenly onto all tortillas, sprinkle with cinnamon. Roll up tortillas and place seam side down on lightly greased 8x8 bak-

Bring margarine, sugars and water to a boil in a medium sauce pan. Reduce heat and simmer, stirring constantly for 3 minutes.

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GENERAL Overview

Greasy wool prices rose strongly for all micron categories, except very fine wool, at last week's sales in Australia. New Zealand also reported strong gains with prices up 1.5% to 2.5%.

British Quotations for Tops

British top quotations reflected the greasy wool markets of the world with quotations rising substantially for all categories quoted, except for 29.5 tops, which remained firm.

Australian Market

In total 43,668 bales of wool were offered for sale during the week, with 37,663 bales purchased by the trade. Pass in rate averaged

Included in the offering were 3,173 bales of crossbred wool, of which 2,882 bales were sold. (pass in rate 9.2%).

Auctions next week

52,000 bales are rostered for sale in Australia, 12,000 bales in New Zealand and a sale of Scottish wool in Bradford is planned for next week

Torres del Paine Tourist Chamber

FIFTEEN Torres del Paine entrepreneurs and operators have decided the creation of the Torres del Paine Tourist Chamber following discrepancies with a similar Chamber in Puerto Natales.

Fernando Paredes, mayor of the small town of Cerro Castillo next to the world famous Natural Park said, "...it was time to have our own chamber, since too many businessmen and officials who don't live or work here were talking about tourism development in our area and in the park."

"I think too often they are not respectful towards us. In Puerto Natales they insist in giving their opinions of how the area and the park should be managed. We never talk about how Puerto Natales should be managed. This however does not mean that we can't act in coordina-

tion on those issues that are of common interest," added Mr. Paredes.

Puerto Natales mayor Tolentino Soto said that, "...it was legitimate for the Torres del Paine people to assess and deal with their problems and challenges." The original fifteen are expected to become 25 when the Torres del Paine Tourist Chamber is legally founded at the end of August.

Ahmed Zalej, president of the Ultima Esperanza Region Chamber of Tourism when asked about the initiative said that the doors of the organization have always been open to all the Region, and stressed he's looking forward to working with the new Torres del Paine Chamber.
"...since many of its associates already belong to our organization."

Two seasons in one day in Punta

PUNTA ARENAS last Saturday virtually experienced two seasons in one day.

Beautiful clear skies and a strong sun helped to record the highest August temperature since 1947, that is 13,9 Celsius 11:35 hours

However by half an hour later winds were blowing at 100 kilometres per hour.

According to the Regional

Weather Forecasting Office from the Chilean Air Force at 12:32 winds reached 89 kilometres at the Punta Arenas airport and an hour later in the city gusts were blowing at 101 kilometres.

Later in the evening it began raining and continued until Sunday morning. The weekend finished with cloudy skies and a maximum temperature of 7 Celsius.

Pinochet's 1988 coup attempt

CHILEAN president Ricardo Lagos said this Monday that opposition leaders were well aware that former dictator General Augusto Pinochet was determined to ignore the results of the 1988 referendum with a new self imposed coup

"As political leaders we were aware of some of these things and we informed other officials at the time," admitted Mr. Lagos following last Sundays' revelation by a former Air Force general and member of the then ruling Junta during the Pinochet regime.

General Fernando Matthei in an advance of his memoirs published in the Santiago press indicated that on Sunday October 5. 1988 Pinochet wanted to ignore the referendum adverse results and convened fellow officers to extend his time in office.

"I'm not leaving," warned Pinochet during a top brass meeting in Government House early morning after having deliberately delayed the outcome of the voting for hours.

However General Matthei, together with the Commander of the Navy and the head of the Carabineros (militarized police), members of the Junta that acted at the time as a Legislative body, firmly opposed Pinochet's intention.

When faced with such determined opposition General Pinochet scrapped the detailed plan he had

worked on to ensure his continuation in power

Actually, General Matthei suspicious of the delay in the release of the referendum results had openly admitted them to the press before meeting with Pinochet.

Mr. Lagos in 1988 was one of the main opponents and together with the rest of the democratic groupings worked out an alliance that in 1990 took office. The first elected president was Patricto Aylwin from the Christian Democrats.

In his memoirs former Commander of the Air Force General Matthei writes that Mr. Pinochet was convinced of winning the 1988 referendum (that extended his term until 1998), but as a precaution had ordered the Intelligence services to prepare an alternative plan in case the opposition was victorious.

In the book to be officially launched next August 25, General Matthei insists that the former dictator was prepared to send troops to the streets to ensure his permanence in power. However the Commanders of the other services refused to accompany Mr. Pinochet.

The 1988 referendum is seen in Chilean history as the starting point for the return to elected civilian rule after fifteen years of ruthless military dictatorship.





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

News in brief

£4 million spend

PUBLIC Works Department approved schemes add up to a projected expenditure of £4,100,000, according to a forecast of progress on this season's capital projects

The report will be considered at a Public Works Committee meeting in the Councillors Office on Monday, August 25.

Included in the projected costs of the 28 projects are;

- ●£340,000 on PWD plant.
- £250.000 on repair of Stanley roads,
- ●£720.000 in total on roads for Lafonia. Port Stephens and Dunbar.
- £540,000 on Sheltered Housing, and,
- •£130,000 on FIGAS facility improvements.

An excessive £92,000 was the original projection for the Gilbert House car park, and Director of Public Works Mike Forrest confirmed yesterday this was due to the slope on the car park.

He said he was recommending a cheaper option to the committee but this would mean leaving "...a more than desirable slope."

Sigma contract

A THREE year fisheries patrol contract is to be awarded once again to Sigma Marine Limited

The company is an offshoot of Byron Marine Ltd. based at Bryon House in Stanley.

Government Chief Executive Chris Simpkins said. "I can advise that, subject to contract, terms have been agreed with Sigma Marine Limited for a three year contract and we are aiming to conclude the formalities by mid-September."

Sigma Marine Ltd. lease their Patrol Vessel Sigma from an overseas vessel charter company.

Sigma Marine were awarded their first three year fisheries patrol contract on August 7, 2000.

Managing Director of Byron Marine Ltd. Lewis Clifton, declined to comment at this early stage in negotiations.

Bank charges go up

AN increase in bank charges means customers will have to keep a closer eye on their account balances from October 1.

A higher charge for unauthorised overdrafts is one of a number of increased costs to the customer by Standard Chartered Bank (SCB) in Stanley, but Manager Nick Hutton says SCB has been absorbing cost inflation for the last ten years and the time has come to make changes.

Mr Hutton told *Penguin News* yesterday, "The last time the bank's tariff was changed was August 1993. Since then our costs have increased by 60% while income growth has been nothing like that. For the last ten years we have absorbed cost inflation but have reached a point where we had to review the prices we charge."

He added, "An example of our increased costs is in communication. In the past we used telex to send and receive international payments but the system has become outdated so in April this year we connected to SWIFT - the Society for Worldwide Interbank Financial Telecommunications. Unfortunately, this has resulted in installation costs and higher operating costs but frankly we had little choice in the matter."

A particular area for an increase in charges is unauthorised overdrafts, from £10 to £15, and returned (bounced) cheques, from £5 to £8.

On this Mr Hutton commented. If someone overdraws their account without referring to us beforehand, it causes us additional time and effort, returning uncovered cheques or sending out letters advising of the overdraft.

"We have decided to increase the charges we levy to compensate for this administration on the people that go overdrawn rather than make a general increase in charges on all our customers. Anyone can avoid the extra charge by staying in credit or within agreed overdraft limits."

He says the bank has tried to introduce a new charging structure that properly reflects the cost of services.

Mr Hutton gave the example that direct debits and standing orders require the same amount of work to set up so the customer would expect them to incur the same charges. A new charge of £2 will be introduced

for establishing direct debits and standing order charges will be reduced to £2.

Additionally a charge is to be introduced for processing direct debits.

Mr Hutton explained. "Each month we receive instructions to process hundreds of direct debits. These require a member of staff checking every account on those lists to ensure sufficient funds are in each account before any direct debit is paid.

"Compare this to a payment by cheque where the system automatically flags any cheques written against insufficient funds - that then be returned unpaid - yet for both no charges were levied. This seemed out of balance and the new charge for processing direct debits is intended to reflect the additional work involved."

A new booklet fully explaining the changes will be sent to all account holders in the coming weeks.

Mr Hutton said. "In making the review we have tried to be more open about the way we operate. We have listed many services for which we do not charge, as well as explained the rationale for some of the charges we do levy."

"We hope this will help our customers to make informed choices about the services we offer and manage their own accounts more effectively. We hope our customers will read our guide carefully and it will help them to get the maximum value out of our services."

North Arm loses full time teacher

THE tiny school at North Arm on East Falklands is to have a `travelling' teacher rather than a full time 'settlement' teacher from the beginning of next term, but the change may not be permanent.

Director of Education Sylvia Cole explained that Karen Armstrong-Ford, the settlement teacher at North Arm School, has been appointed to a teaching post at the Stanley Infant/Junior School. This happened towards the end of last term

Mrs Cole said North Arm parents were consulted, during the last term, on their intentions concerning their school age children and the dates on which they anticipated they would move into Stanley House Hostel to study at the Infant Junior School.

Infant Junior School.

She said, "It appeared at that time, that from October 2003 there would be two children at North Arm School, and from March 2004 there would be one reception child at the school. There was no suggestion that other children were expected to move into the area."

On the strength of this information the Director of Education, on the Camp Education Supervisor's advice, decided not to replace the settlement teacher but to make North Arm part of a travelling teacher's beat.

elling teacher's beat.

Mrs Cole said, "The children, in decreasing numbers, would be visited for two weeks out of every six and would receive daily telephone lessons in the intervening period..."

"In the meantime, the situation will be closely monitored. It is not good-value-for money to appoint a teacher on a contract, only to find that there are no children to teach.

"North Arm school has not been changed forever..."

LAWYERS, teachers, marine biologists, pilots, nurses, government officials, a host of managers and talented tradespeople.

No, not a corporate gathering, or a government seminar, or a convention of professionals, but a bunch of old photographs of Falklands school children in the 1980s.

As it happens a pressing wine drinking appointment with my mother prevented me from attending the school reunion in the Narrows Bar on the weekend - and I'm rather glad that it did.

Not because I wouldn't have enjoyed reminiscing with old friends and acquaintances, but because I am thankful I didn't have to encounter a picture of myself in the most appallingly short dress a West Sports has ever witnessed. (Sheila Harvey, you'll pay for submitting that photograph).

In fact a great many images of scandalous fashion aberrations, were, I believe, a very entertaining part of the evening.

Closely followed of course by the inevitable and brutal disparagement of our mainly overseas contracted teachers of the time - the bully, the sexist, the alcoholic, the one who played golf all day with a broom and a rolled up piece of paper, the one who taught us completely the wrong history syllabus and the one who insisted on referring to us all as 'spoiled b***tards' - to mention but a few.

Bearing that in mind, it really makes one wonder how on earth those school years managed to produce such a generous amount of reasonably well adjusted and copiously qualified individuals.

I can only assume that in amongst the bug eyed psychotics that loosely termed themselves teachers, there were an inspiring few that managed to:

a. persuade the girls that passing their exams was almost as important waving at the soldiers as they drove past the school windows,

b. convince the boys there were greater achievements in life than resurrecting old Argentine jeeps or discovering exciting additions to their ammunition/shrapnel collections.

Still, if Islanders can make it as professionals in spite of the early influence of such a motley crew of educators imagine what our future students might achieve bearing in mind that - on the whole - current teaching staff appear to retain most of their marbles.



Passports unacceptable for United States travel

THE United States, the third most popular holiday destination for Islanders, has declared non machine readable passports, such as those issued in the Falklands, as no longer acceptable for use on entry to their country under the Visa Waiver Programme.

The Customs and Immigration Department in Stanley have been working hard to overcome the problem of the period prior to the installation of a machine readable passport system.

The Department will eventually have a special passport machine installed in Stanley, but within the UK government programme of installations the Falklands is "...well down the list," and the Department may not have theirs installed by the installation engineer for at least another six months.

In the mean time, from October 1, persons without machine readable passports will only be able to enter the US if they personally apply for, and are issued with, an entry visa. But these cannot be obtained through the post as applicants must attend in person in the first instance at least one interview with, for example, the US Embassy in Santiago, Chile. It would then take about two working days before a visa would be issued.

Collector of Customs Robert King said. "An installation engineer will travel to Santiago in September to install their system, but he could not come to the Islands because he was already tied to a tight programme.

Individuals could apply to Chile for passports, but again they would have to apply in person and collect the passport because, "...we have no secure or cost effective means of despatch or receipt to Santiago for passports," said Mr King.

He said however, the Department has been speaking to embassies and has been working on a 'fast tracking' system for Falklands residents who go to Chile to acquire a US visa or passport, even during peak application times.

Immigration Officer Dawn Hoy is currently in Santiago on holiday and hopes to visit both the British and US embassies to see if she can,

"...progress the speeding up of the facilitation of one or the other for people travelling from here via Chile to the United States."

So in summary, by October 1 it is hoped that people travelling from the Islands will be able to:

 a. be quickly issued with a passport in Santiago, or,

 b. obtain a visa relatively quickly in Santiago even during peak times, or.

 c. apply for and obtain a machine readable passport or a US visa while in the UK.

Mr King said. "If people want to travel to the States over the next few months then I recommend they come and see us, and we will assist them the best we can to acquire appropriate documentation of one form or another."

Students happy with A Level results

'A'LEVEL results have arrived later than usual as a result of an internet problem in the U.K.

Three Falkland Island Students took 'A' Levels at Peter Symonds College in the last academic year. Sian Ferguson and Tanya Marsh said they had received the result they expected and were pleased to have passed three subjects each: Tanya gained grades in Sport and PE, Media Studies and Design and Technology.

Sian passed English Literature, Geography and Media Studies.

The Islands' biggest success was Michael Poole who, as a result of A's in Business Studies and Sports and PE and C's in Media Studies and General Studies, will achieve his ambition of taking up Business Administration at University.

Director of Education Sylvia Cole said, "Michael has worked extremely hard to achieve these grades and we wish him success with his future studies."

She added. "The A level pass rate at Peter Symonds College was 98%. It is little wonder that it is amongst the top ten sixth form col-

leges in the UK."

The AS results have also been published.

These are the exams which students take at the end of their first year at Peter Symonds; most students take four subjects. Results have been pleasing with 75% of students gaining A-C grades, many of them above the grade predicted.

Mrs Cole said, "Two students who gained four 'A' grades each should be congratulated, as should the student who gained 1 'A' and 3 'B's. Well done Claire. Vikki and Ben."

She added. "There were a few disappointing grades and we will be working on these to ensure that those involved work hard next term to meet expectations.

"On the whole, this was a pleasing performance which reflects our drive to improve standards and strive for excellence.

"I shall watch this group of students and their results, with interest next July."

Results of courses at Chichester College are still being received. These will be featured shortly.

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What did you do when the telly went off?

WITH a howling gale battering the Islands on Saturday night, Falklands inhabitants who snuggled down for an evening in front of the telly had their entertainment cut short just after 9pm when the picture went blank and failed to reappear until two days later.

Gale force winds hit the British Forces Broadcasting Service (BFBS) satellite dish head at Mount Pleasant on Saturday afternoon, causing it to go off-line

BFBS Station Manager, Richard Hutchinson explained, "The large dish at the front of the BFBS studios receives the BFBS radio and television service directly from the UK

If the signal is disrupted then we lose our incoming service for the Falklands.

The BFBS engineering department worked throughout the weekend and traced the fault to the dish alignment. Mr Hutchinson said. "For safety reasons due to the size of the dish we had to wait for the winds to drop to a safe level before the dish could be climbed by military riggers and re-aligned

The dish had only moved by a matter of millimetres but in receiving terms we were missing the satellite signal by over one hundred

Once the dish had been safely released and realigned the signal returned and BFBS returned to normal broadcasting. Mr Hutchinson thanked the BFBS audience for its. understanding and patience during the weekend

Penguin News headed out of the office on Tuesday morning, the day after the service resumed, and asked, "What did you do when the telly went off?"

For some people the pain of no television was short lived. These individuals, such as Dorothy Goss, Hannah Humphries and Denise McPhee and her daughters. Hannah and Jessica, merely reached for the remote and changed channels to watch one of numerous networks provided by KTV Ltd

Others headed to Stanley video stores on Sunday morning and spent the day, another windy one. in front of the telly. One video store customer. Sharon Marsh. joked that Stanley video outlets fixed the BFBS service to fail " .. in order to boost their trade.

Her daughter, Sammy, took a more laid back approach to the problem and. "...whinged for a while then just stared at the television, hoping it would come back

Serious casualties from the lack of BFBS TV on Sunday were foot-ball fans. With the beginning of the Premiership on Saturday, many fans were looking forward to highlights from the first day of action plus the Liverpool v Chelsea game on Sunday. Glenda Watson said her husband Neil, "...was at the point of suicide because he could not watch or listen to football."
She added, "I consoled myself

by drinking extra wine with my

daughter until 2am."

Susie Hansen from Main Point Farm said she had heard, "...a few grumbles from my husband and other family members who were planning to watch the football, otherwise we pretty much carried on as normal

Some households took the lack of television as a sign to get busy around the house. While Ian Doherty painted a bedroom in his home. Shona Rozee sorted through cards she received when her son was born

Daniel Reade from Mount Pleasant headed for the gym and Juliet Poole went to the pub. Her friend. Terrianne Ormand said she chose to spend her telly-free time tucked up in bed.

Priscilla Betts was a little more coy when asked what she got up to without television, exclaiming, "I can't tell you that!

Some people headed out for the day on Sunday. Pauline Igao and her family headed to the beach. while Andrew Newman said he and his family went for a drive to Moody Brook, Sapper Hill and the back of Stanley Common before heading home for a. "...traditional Falklands tea with drop scones.



My question was going to be directed to the councillors along the lines of. "The knock on effect of the abattoir has pushed up the price of mutton or beef to the consumer in Stanley. With the importance meat has on the cost of living index, the over the counter prices for this commodity must rub off on the islands cost of living.

Taking this opportunity to build on the concept of the Falkland Islands Meat Company (the second one with this title to my knowledge) was put in place to give farmers another source of income.

Only £5 being paid for a good mutton wether and £8 for a lamb is not exactly wooing their sheep into the lairage, when most farmers can get £20 a lamb carcass and £12 for a mutton carcass at the farm gate.

DAP Dash for Antarctic trips



PUNTA Arenas DAP Airways will be receiving on lease at the end of September a 50 seat refurbished De Havilland Dash-7 (above) to be used this summer for charter flights to Antarctica and possibly the Falklands and other destinations.

Director of Civil Aviation in the Falkland Islands, Andrew Newman. confirmed, "DAP have operated occasional charters to Stanley Airport... normally delivering spares for fishing boats or the odd businessman or tourist, although generally if the planned visit is of a business nature we encourage them to travel on LanChile..

DAP's CEO Andrés Pivcevic announced that in coming days several of the company's pilots would be travelling to Toronto, Canada to begin training with the new aircraft.
"The 1982 Dash-7 operation

involves a million and a half US dollars during the first season and DAP will be leasing it for 18 months to begin with," said Mr Pivcevic adding, "...it's a four engine aircraft, a model with proven

Antarctic experience and sufficient autonomy to fly and return from Punta Arenas to Tte. Marsh in St George Island (1,200 miles)." The leasing is financed with Canadian

Mr Pivcevic said the main purpose of the Dash-7 operation this coming Antarctic season is to transport tourists from Punta Arenas to the Chilean base of Tte Marsh and from there they will board a Russian flag cruise working for the Dutch company Ocean Wide Expeditions and complete a ten day tour of the area.

"It's a new experience. Antarctica XXI, which we've been working on for the last two years plus the fact that the market is demanding this kind of air-sea cruise. stressed Mr Pivcevic.

When not in the cruise schedule the Dash-7 will be flying to Puerto Williams, reinforcing the Punta Arenas-Ushuaia route, and, "...we expect charter flights to the Falklands..." (MP/PN).



Dae added, "I would like to say a big, big thank you to all who came performers and audience, especially those who braved the roads and the cold to make the night a great suc-



General Practice with the Health Visitor

Help! my child won't eat

MANY children go through phases of refusing to eat certain foods or at times refusing to eat anything at all.

This is particularly common in children up to the age of five years, but may occur at any time. It is often a way of showing independence (the terrible twos) and is a normal part of growing up

Although it is very worrying, children will not harm themselves if they don't eat enough for a while. They may need less to eat than you think

It may help to discuss the problem with other parents who have already gone through the same situation with their child.

If the problem shows no signs of improving, or if you are worried about your child's weight and growth, you can contact your Health Visitor, or GP for further advice.

What can I do?

Offer regular meals and snacks, as this is better than letting your child pick through the whole day.

Eat at the same time as your child if possible, as he will learn from you. Try and make them enjoyable social occasions. Make them fun

Sit at the table if possible and use brightly coloured and attractive plates and cups.

Try to eat in a calm, relaxed area without the television - children are easily distracted.

Try not to rush a meal, as your child may be slow to eat, yet try not to let meals drag on for too long - half an hour is about right.

How can I help? Never force a child to eat.

Your child is telling you he has had enough when:

- he turns his head away,
- he pushes the bowl or plate away or onto the floor,
 - he screams or shouts.
 - he spits food out repeatedly,
- he holds his food in his mouth and refuses to swallow it.

Try not to show that you are worried or annoyed by your child not eating. Although it is a very difficult thing to do, if your child is



not eating, take the food away without comment.

It is a good idea for children to use their fingers to play with food, do not worry if they make a mess.

If your child stops eating at a meal, try once to encourage him to take a little more, if this is successful show him you are pleased (say "Good Boy, well done") and smile. Offer a reward such as taking him to the park later or spending some special time playing together. Do not offer a reward of food.

Which foods do I give when? Give small portions of food at meal times. If these are finished offer more. Do not take food away and offer a completely different meal if the first one is refused.

Fizzy drinks, squash and milk can fill a child up, as can crisps, biscuits and cakes, so he has a smaller appetite for food at meal times. If giving these, avoid them from about one and a half hours before meal times.

While a child is being fussy and refusing foods, it is best not to offer new foods. Finger foods are easier to manage as a child can feed himself.

Try sandwiches, sausages, cheese slices or soft cheese, chips, fish fingers, vegetable slices, and pieces of fruits.

Milk is a nutritious drink - aim for about 1 pint a day, but this should not replace meals. Be careful not to let your child drink lots of milk in the day or at night.

Sensible eating for 1-5 years Try a variety of foods for a well balanced diet. Suggestions to help

Milk and Dairy Foods

Try to give a pint of full fat milk daily. Try cheese, yogurts, fromage frais, custard and milk puddings as good alternatives to some of the milk.

Meat and Alternatives

All types of meat and fish are suitable. Many children enjoy minced meat, sausages, chicken, fish fingers and fish in sauces. Plus vegetables like chick peas and lentils make good casseroles. Eggs and baked beans are good too.

Starchy Foods

Give these foods at each meal. Most children enjoy eating breakfast cereals and porridge. Other starchy foods to encourage include bread, potatoes, Chapati, yam and green banana, pasta, tinned spaghetti and rice.

Fruit and vegetables

Give two portions a day - cooked or raw. All types fresh, frozen or tinned are good.

Fats and Oils

Growing children still need margarine/butter and oils.

Sugary Foods

Foods containing sugar are often part of a child's diet. Try not to give them between meals. Look after your child's teeth.

Vitamins

A vitamin supplement, containing vitamins A, C and D, is recommended for all children from six months up to that least two years and preferably five years. Ask your health visitor about this.

Suggestions to help you Breakfast


Small bowl of breakfast cereal and milk or toast fingers with butter/margarine and jam/honey. Beaker of milk to drink.

Snack meal Sandwich in bite size shapes e.g. ham, cheese, peanut butter.

Main Meal

Pasta dishes, for example, macaroni cheese, spaghetti bolognaise, chapati/rice and curry. Fish in white, cheese or parsley sauce. Roast meat or mince (e.g. shepherds pie). Fish fingers/chicken nuggets. Serve with fingers of carrot, swede or peas and a scoop of mashed potato. Fruit segments/slices/shapes. Beaker of water for fruit juice.

Bedtime Beaker of milk and a biscuit.

Wool market report for week ending August 16

GENERAL overview

Wool prices once again rose strongly for all micron categories at sales in Australia during trading last week. Rises of up to 15 pence per kilogram clean were recorded for fine to mid micron fleece wool lots and 1 to 5 pence per kilogram clean at the broader end of the micron spectrum.

Locks, crutchings and oddments were all also reported dearer during the week.

Auctions next week

46.000 bales are rostered for sale in Australia next week.

New reconciliation attempt in Chile

CHILEAN president Ricardo Lagos admitted that contrary to his Argentine counterpart Nestor Kirchner he has no plans to propose the repeal of the current Amnesty Law.

In a long Sunday interview with the Brazilian press, President Lagos who this week began an official visit to Brazil said that in spite of protests from Chilean human rights organisations regarding his initiative on the issue, "I don't have the political strength to propose the elimination of the Amnesty

"And even if I had sufficient votes in Congress and managed to repeal the law, what would the le-gal effects be? None," indicated President Lagos.

Last week Mr. Lagos made public an official initiative to help reconciliation and heal the country's tragic legacy of killings, torture and disappearances going back to the regime of former General Pinochet who took power in a bloody military coup almost thirty years ago, September 11, 1973 until 1990.

Some of the key points of the proposal that will have to be approved by Congress, contemplate compensations for people who were tortured under the Pinochet regime, and commuted or reduced sentences for those Armed Forces or Police officers who only followed orders when they carried out human rights abuses.

There's a clear distinction between those responsible for the creation of the abuse system and those who followed orders. plained President Lagos.

When asked about Argentine

president Nestor Kirchner's decision to request Congress to repeal legislation that pardoned the military, Mr. Lagos replied that, "...it depends on how the Judiciary branch of each country operates.

In Chile, most of the disappeared cases were claimed before the Judiciary even under Pinochet regime. In other countries, this only happened after the end of the military regime," said president Lagos.

Last week the Argentine Lower House repealed two bills from the eighties that exempted the military accused of human rights abuse. The Senate still has to consider the initiative and if finally approved will also involve the Argentine Supreme

In Chile until now compensation has only been paid to the fami-lies of people who were killed during the regime, which ran from 1973 to 1990.

'Many people who have information are still sunk in a cruel and persistent silence," said President Lagos who admits his proposal does not bring a definitive solution to the suffering of many Chileans. but it is a step forward.

Pensions granted to some of the victims or their families, now averaging 400 US dollars a month, with President Lagos proposal would be increased 50% and extended to more people, including the relatives of soldiers killed in clashes with leftist guerrillas or terrorist attacks.

Chile's population is still deeply divided between those who blame Pinochet for human rights abuses and those who praise him for the foundations of the current

economic stability.

'A bottle of Maradona please'

THE former Argentine football star might be blobby, sometimes stoned and a regular guest of Cuban president Fidel Castro, but he's still good money in the capitalist world

An Argentine winery is preparing to launch several types of numbered bottles branded "Maradona" that already have an exceptionally strong market in Japan and Europe.

We have production problems since Japan is demanding 800,000 bottles per month, and they are even willing to pay 1,000 US dollars per piece for a few bottles with Diego's autograph." indicated Patricio Colman from Alquimia Producciones the Buenos Aires public relations company responsible for the launching.

The winery is Raíces de Agrelo located in Mendoza, Argentina's

top vine and wine producing area. and the objective is to supply all levels of domestic consumer market and exports.

Besides Japan, the company has also received "Maradona" wine orders from Italy where the Argentine ace successfully played for several years in Napoli.

"The potential for overseas sales is huge, Diego's name has a magic to itself. We're already talking with buyers in Latinamerica. United States, Russia, England and Spain," said Mr. Colman

The first production line will be a 30,500 numbered bottles of Cabemet Sauvignon Malbec, 2002 crop that is expected to reach the market at the equivalent of 8 US dollars

Kirchner-Lagos meeting in Patagonia

ARGENTINE and Chilean presidents Nestor Kirchner and Ricardo Lagos are scheduled to meet in Patagonia at the end of the month according to Punta Arenas and Rio Gallegos press.

Even when the official program is still in the making the most certain place is the tourist resort of Calafate in the home province of Santa Cruz where Mr. Kirchner was governor before becoming president.

One of the main topics of the meeting will be the development of Patagonia particularly tourism promotion. The summit is programmed to coincide with the meeting of over six hundred Chambers of Commerce from Chile and Argentina and national tourist opera-

The idea is that both president visit the province of Santa Cruz and Magallanes, possibly on the 28th", indicated Jorge Restovic, local representative of the Santiago government in Punta Arenas.

After the meeting in Calafate. President Lagos is scheduled to visit Puerto Natales. However weather conditions and the short runway at the local airport could force a last minute cancel

President Kirchner grew up in Rio Gallegos and his mother was born in the southern port of Punta Are-

British companies demand Argentina pays up

BRITISH GAS and National Grid, both UK companies with strong investments in Argentina are demanding compensations from the Argentine government for losses experienced during the application of the Economic Emergency Bill.

The claims, involving over 350 million US dollars, have been presented before the United Nations Committee on International Trade Law, UNCITRAL, the UN's main body regarding international business litigation.

British Gas is the main partner of Metrogas, Buenos Aires main natural gas distribution system, and National Grid controls Transener. one of the country's principal electricity distributors.

Both companies argue the Argentine government ignored contracts and the investment protec-

tion agreement with Britain. Ad hoc courts in the framework of UNICITRAL will decide on the cases

Argentina also faces demands from other foreign corporations with investments in the country but these are lodged in the World Bank's Centre for Settlement of Investment Disputes, Ciadi

These claims total 4.5 billion US dollars basically from nine companies who allege, "...indirect expropriation," because of the 2002 Economic Emergency Bill and the strong devaluation of the Argentine currency.

The total number of companies involved in the Ciadi litigation amount to twenty, although eleven, including Spain's Telefónica, have not made public their compensation claims.

# Falklands Patrol Vessel in `poacher' intercept

FALKI ANDS Patrol Vessesl Dorada will return home on Wednesday after assisting in the chase and eventual arrest of a Uruguayan flagged ship. Viarsa, suspected of poaching the rare Patagonian Toothfish.

Dorada was called to assist the South African tug John Ross and Australian ship Southern Supporter in a twenty day chase through Antarctic waters

On Wednesday Viarsa was boarded by Australian and South African Fisheries Officers and she has now embarked on the seven day trip to Cape Town flanked by John Ross and Southern Supnorter.

Falklands Fisheries Department Marine Officer Jon Clark yesterday told *Penguin News*, "I was approached by Australian Customs Service senior officials about a week ago to ask if the Falkland Islands Government Fisheries Department would be willing, and was in a position to offer assistance."

"At that time *Fiarsa* was east of the Cape of Good Hope on a heading for the River Plate. I replied that if they went through the Foreign and Commonwealth Office we could well be able to assist and that's what happened.

"There was then some discussions and an examination of the legal position in terms of under what conditions we could become involved."

"On Friday August 22 in the afternoon (local time) I finally received a call from the FCO asking if we could divert *Dorada* to go and assist with the pursuit. She had a very long way to go as at that time the actual pursuit was only just crossing the Greenwich Meridian.

"We were well placed to assist though, because *Dorada* is presently on charter to the South Georgia government and was just west of South Georgia itself. Thus *Dorada* had the advantage of being half way to the chase, rather than having to set off from

Stanley.

Dorada then had to face some extremely bad weather before making contact with the other vessels on the afternoon of Tuesday August 26.

By that time the Souther Supporter had been joined by salvage tug John Ross, the idea being that there would be a, "...fairly big show of force with three ships grouped tightly round the Viarsa." said Mr Clark.

Through Tuesday night and up until early Wednesday morning the weather rapidly deteriorated, with wind up to Force 8/9 and gusting ten.

Initially it appeared that boarding would be impossible, but the wind dropped away and at midday local time, a group including elements from the South African Fisheries Police and Australian Fisheries Officers, boarded *Viarsa*.

Mr Clark said, "Dorada was in close contact and provided her inflatable boats as safety back up and for ferrying stores on to Viarsa.

"Once this had taken place the Australians commenced an investigation of the vessel and sent non essential crew across to the Southern

Supporter.

About 40 crew were arrested. They were fully cooperative. There was no violence and no injuries.

Mr Clark said, "The John Ross was released to return to her charter and on Wednesday night the Dorada and Southern Supporter began to escort Viarsa in the direction of Cape Town, South Africa."

At 0410 local time yesterday the *Dorada* was released and she is now en route for Stanley.

Southern Supporter continues to escort the Viarsa, the plan being that at a point off Cape Town the ship will be replenished with fuel and stores and the vessel will be taken to Freemantle, Australia.

Mr Clark confirmed that *Dorada* was unarmed at the time of the chase, as she was on charter in CCAMLR waters.

In the past *Dorada* has made armed arrests of vessels discovered to be poaching in Falkland Islands waters

THERE must be few journalists in the history of mankind that haven't

THERE must be the Journalists in the history of manners suffered the politician's put down.

In fact I'm of the opinion that individuals with press ambitions shouldn't have been made to feel no bigger than presume to the title 'reporter' until they've been made to feel no bigger than

My baptism of fire occurred some years ago, and although I can't remember the exact details. I do recall that the politician in question was Mike

I recollect I made a rather snotty remark in a public meeting along the lines of, "How can you possibly comment on something you know nothing about," to which Councillor Summers quickly replied, "...well it's never stopped

I still cringe

But it taught me to approach my subject with a little more caution - and I recalled the exchange at this week's public meeting while listening to the comments of some on government's proposed 'intervention' in terms of the

One gentleman vented for a good few minutes about "...not wanting his money spent on some person's kid," while another claimed ".. it's up to

parents to look after their children."

Now I'm not suggesting for a moment that the individuals in question weren't entitled to their opinion - of course they were - but it perturbed me that one in particular didn't appear to have even a smidgen of knowledge of the subject on which he ranted - that is, he clearly hadn't the faintest idea why the proposal for government assistance had even arisen

It appeared to have entirely passed him by that despite the existence of

two nurseries in Stanley

a there are not enough places available to cover all three age groups (nursery, infant and young junior)

b parents using the nurseries agree the facilities are less than desirable.

c, the Islands work force, including FIG desperately needs its working

These are not just opinions - they are facts.

It is also worth noting that the situation is not a criticism of the carers, because of the dearth of profit in child-care, nursery propreitors are limited

in terms of the facilities they can afford to rent
Neither is it a criticism of those who provide the buildings, who do so at a low cost and thus presumably cannot afford to provide highly sophisticated

No, the situation is that there is a vital need for a comprehensive approach to child-care in the Falklands - not just for babies and infants during the day but older juniors before school, at lunchtime, after school and inholiday

And that is exactly what is taking place. A representative group of par-

ents, teachers and nursery proprietors are currently compiling a package of ideas for examination by the Falkland Islands Government.

An important requirement has been identified within the Islands and it is being sensibly and responsibly investigated by those it directly affects, and the results will be examined by those who can help, and should help, in terms financial assistance

### PN reports on the Public Meeting

### Same director different budget



THE Department of Agriculture and the Department of Mineral Resources (above) will have the same Director but, "...each will have its budget and its staff," confirmed Councillor Mike Summers at Tuesday's public meeting.

Councillors were asked what would be achieved in positive terms by amalgamating the two departments under the Directorship of Phyllis Rendell.

Councillor Summers said, "It is sensible more in terms of cost reduction and use of the Director's time.

He said it was not vital that Mrs Rendell did not have agricultural knowledge because a Senior Agricultural Advisor was to be appointed, and in terms of the Department of Agriculture Mrs Rendell's role, "...will be largely administrative."

During the discussion Councillor Norma Edwards complained that the decision had not be properly discussed by councillors.

Councillor Summers said.

"That's not true it was discussed at the General Purposes Committee.

Councillor Édwards said, "We were told at GPC that this was going to happen.

Councillor Summers disagreed.

Responding to further questions he and Councillor Stephen Luxton explained that the cost of two and a half members of staff would be saved as a result of the amalgamation amounting to a figure between £80,000 and £100,000

There will be, "...additional consolidation from the early part of next year," when two contract posts will be amalgamated, said Councillor Summers.

The possibility of a planned merge of the two departments was first publicly noted in the August 15 edition of *Penguin News* 

The Director of Agriculture Peter Johnston completes his contract in December 2003 and had advised the Chief Executive Chris Simpkins that he was not seeking an exten-

### International toothfish operators say 'well done' on Viarsa capture


LEGAL toothfish operators around the world have applauded the international operation led by the Australian government, which has seen the capture of the Uruguayan flagged Viarsa.

Members of the Coalition of Legal Toothfish Operators (COLTO) members, under the chairmanship of Hamish Wylie of Seafish Ltd. in the Falklands, say they acknowledged those in the Australian, South African, United Kingdom and United States Governments who combined to put an end to the extensive ocean chase of the *Warsa*.

A spokesman for the group extended COLTO's congratulations to those officers, crew, fisheries officers and servicemen on government vessels involved in the chase, and especially those on the Australian civilian patrol vessel, the *Southern Supporter*.

COLTO members also praised those on the South African and UK vessels who provided the backup and boarding capabilities to bring the chase to a successful conclusion.

Through their recently formed association COLTO (with 27 member companies in ten countries), said the capture of the Viarsa will send a strong message to illegal toothfish operators that environmental vandalism and theft of toothfish stocks will not be tolerated by Governments, conservationists, and legal industry alike.



COLTO spokesperson Jenny Hodder said COLTO members would continue to fight to stop any toothfish being taken illegally

"We will continue to work closely with governments, conservation groups and the general public to stop these criminal activities before legal operators are put out of business, toothfish stocks are decimated, and the unique Antarctic environment is destroyed.

"To see international coopera-

tion in the marine environment on this scale is almost unprecedented, and is a powerful message to all toothfish pirates that Governments have declared war on illegal toothfish operators."

COLTO was officially launched in Brussels in March this year with a \$US100,000 Wanted Campaign designed to attract information leading to the capture and conviction of toothfish pirates and companies involved in illegal op-

erations

Ms Hodder said the campaign had so far been very successful and COLTO had received valuable and damming evidence of ongoing pirate operations.

It would be working on a number of strategies to send a clear message to illegal operators that they should get out before being caught and prosecuted for illegal activities

#### Fire destroys island holiday cottage

A MYSTERY fire has devastated one of the holiday cottages on Carcass Island.

Owner Rob McGill says that when he arrived home on the Island last Friday there was no indication that a fire was burning. The only hint he had was when he went out that night to check the inverter on his wind turbine and noticed. "...an earthy smoky smell," but thought it was coming from Steeple Jason, as is sometimes the case at Carcass Island.

However, Rob said he knew something was wrong as his electricity kept tripping out and he spent the night in candlelight.

In the morning when he went outside he saw that the holiday cottage was gone and in its place was a twisted heap of tin, the cottage stove and a pile of ash.

Both power lines were down and laying on the top of the heap after the fire had burnt through their supporting pole, however the vegetation around the cottage survived with only a small amount of scorching.

Rob is still uncertain what caused the fire but he has been told there was a heavy thunder and lightening storm near the region while he was away. FIBS

### ET and AI improves quality of Falklands beef

FOLLOWING the establishment of the abattoir at Sand Bay, plans are being formed for the eventual export of Falkland Island Beef and work on improving bloodlines is under way.

According to the Beef Advisor. Doug Martin, at this early stage, year round supply of beef for the local market is the first objective. however the time is rapidly approaching when supply will outstrip demand.

Mr Martin said that with quality in mind it was decided to begin an embryo transfer (ET) programme to boost numbers, and to introduce new bloodlines.

Angus and Poll Hereford embryos were imported and the programme commenced on January 26. 2002 at Smylies farm, and ended at West Lagoons on February 8. Twelve farms including the National Beef Herd participated

The programme resulted in twelve Angus and seven Hereford heifers and eight Angus and nine Hereford bulls

Mr Martin said the season was one of the driest on record, and many of the cows presented were in a condition score of 1.5 - 2 on a scale of 5 He explained, "One of the problems encountered was the lateness of the programme due to funding issues and the fact that there was some opposition to the proposed ET programme.

It was proven from research that the potential risk posed by the use of embryos was indeed less than that of artificial insemination. the embryos being washed ten times in a solution of glycol. This process cannot be carried out with semen.

Mr Martin said Bryan Charleston from the United Kingdom did an, "...excellent job" transferring the embryos. He added, "We were indeed fortunate to have this expertise for the cost of an airfare. Under the circumstances the results speak for themselves.

One issue which arose after the birth of a number of the calves was that of parentage. Mr Martin explained, "Whilst the Poll Herefords were true to type there was some doubt as to the parentage of the Angus.

The result of this was that after some discussion with ArTech in New Zealand, the company who supplied the embryos, we agreed to receive a further 50 embryos of Poll Hereford origin for no charge.

It was also decided that for fu-

ture programmes cows not suitable for ET would be synchronised for artificial insemination (AI), "...thus making more efficient use of allocated funding.

To provide some direction, a Beef Industry Development proposal and projected funding arrangements were produced by the Beef Adviser in May 2002. The proposal was presented to the farming community with comments requested.

Mr Martin said these were generally favourable, with some, ...reservation in relation to the proposed establishment of an ET/ Al facility.

2003 AI/ET programme
Top quality Angus would be purchased. in addition to Poll Hereford, Shorthorn, Red Poll, South Devon and Angus.

Semen was purchased from New Zealand and Australia and included Angus, Poll Hereford, Shorthorn, South Devon, Red Poll, Murray Grey and Belted Gallo-

Fifteen farms participated in

the programme; 209 cows received embryos and 173 cows were inseminated.

Mr Martin said, "Rob Yelland from Australia was the technician chosen and again we were fortunate to have only to meet the cost of air fares for the work to be carried out.

"He proved to be an excellent choice, and completed the work in two weeks, with the valuable assistance of Nyree Heathman, who also played a major role in the organisation of the programme.

"Having completed training in Al in Australia last year Nyree was able to complete some of the AL along with Kevin Lawrence and Donna Minnell.

He added, "We are currently in the planning stage for the 2004 programme and hope to commence synchronisation directly after the Christmas break in early January.

### Help BFFI to defend you

THE Commander of British Forces in the Falkland Islands is asking for help from the local community with an exercise taking place next month.

Military personnel from Mount Pleasant and Hillside Camp will be involved in Exercise Cape Petrel between September 8 and 12. The exercise is an annual event when the military are evaluated in their role in defending the Islands by their headquarters in London.

In order to provide realism to the exercise, the British Forces Headquarters at Mount Pleasant (HQ BFFI) is inviting the civilian population to participate by reporting any, "...unusual incidents or movements throughout the period 8-12 September of (exercise) enemy forces.

"The exercise is due to finish at lunchtime on Friday and we are expecting an 'enemy invasion' any time after first light on the 8th."

Media Operations Officer. Captain Doug Soulsby explained. "The enemy will be dressed in normal British combat uniform but they will be wearing woollen hats instead of the normal beret or helmet.

"The enemy are not only likely to be active around MPA and Hillside Camp but may conduct operations in other areas in the form of helicopter or amphibious landings.



"There will undoubtedly be 'enemy' night patrols so, if your dog is getting excited in the middle of the night, please let us know."

Any member of the public who sees or hears any suspicious activity during the exercise dates can report it to the HQ BFFI on 75319 at any time of day or night.

Captain Soulsby said, "Give us as many details as you can in terms of numbers of people seen or heard, directions of travel, any weapons carried, etc. Grid references are always useful."

'Play' or reality?

Captain Soulsby explained

that, in order to avoid confusion arising, "... between exercise play and a real incident, each report will be analysed immediately to ensure that it is part of the exercise scenario or not.

"Any member of the public who witnesses any unusual incidents and suspects them to be real (non-exercise) should contact the civilian emergency services as per normal."

He added. "Once again, participation by the public will be greatly appreciated by this HQ - help us to defend you."

### Job swap for MP charity

A MILITARY policewoman from Mount Pleasant (MPA) will swap jobs with the Falkland Islands Warrant Officer next week in aid of charity.

Corporal Victoria Parker and FIWO will trade places on Thursday and Friday.

## Your guestions answered write to, fax, email or telephone penguin news with your quest

WHY are viruses, such as blasterworm, allowed to come into computers in the islands via Cable and Wireless?

As the only internet service provider in the Islands, do you not have a responsibility to protect Falklands computers?

(It costs a lot of money, not just to download the infected files, but to get the problem fixed.)

Cable and Wireless Customer Services Manager Emma Edwards gave the following reply

Section 7.2 of the Horizon Internet Terms & Conditions states. 'Although C&W may configure the Service so as to provide some security features, the Customer shall be solely responsible for providing for any security or privacy that it may desire for its computer network and any data stored on that network or assessed through the Service.

The Customer acknowledges and assumes all habilities relating to, and risks associated with, unauthorized access by a third party via the Service to such computer

network and data.

What this means is that you the Customer are responsible for protecting your own computer systems from the outside world Worms such as 'Blaster' are intelligent computer programmes that spread around the Internet without any human assistance causing all sorts of problems. This particular worm takes advantage of a security hole in a computers operating system, something C&W has no control over. A patch which fixes this hole has been available to download for several months.

How can you prevent it happing again? There are a number of things you can do; make sure that the operating system and other programmes on your computer have all the latest patch/updates applied (usually available from the vendor's web site e.g. www.microsoft.com). You should install an Antivirus package (e.g. Norton or McAfee) with up to date virus definitions. keep them up to date: install a firewall - a piece of software such as ZoneAlarm that controls what your computer can access, and more importantly, who and what can access your computer.

Why is Cable and Wireless not blocking spam with its spam filters? I receive too many spam

e-mails every day.

C&W do not operate a spam filter on its Horizon Internet Service. On two separate occasions recently questionnaires have been sent out asking if spam is a problem. On both occasions less than 10 replies were received, suggesting that spam was not a problem.

If Cable & Wireless were to apply a spam filter on the Horizon email server, it would also prevent some genuine emails from being delivered to their rightful owners (as no filtering mechanism is 100% accurate), therefore opening the company up to criticism for improper e-mail handling.

There are a number of programmes that can help you control such as McAfee's SpamKiller, but by far the most effective way is to click the unsubscribe from mail list button/ link' on the email, this takes a little time to work, but we know of people that used to receive 20 plus junk emails a day, go down to one or two a day, or none.

Penguin News with your questions

HOW many drivers in the Falklands hold valid PSV driving licences, and are all drivers carrying fare paying passengers required to do so?

What is the difference between grades 1 & 2 on the PSV driving licence, and are they covered by law in the Falklands? What is the rules regarding insurance cover for fare paying passengers in taxi and mini buses?

What is the number of fare paying passengers a driver can legally carry if he does not hold a PSV licence?

If a taxi is carrying fare paying passengers in a seat belt zone, who is responsible for ensuring that passengers are wearing seat belts, the driver or the passenger?

Inspector Len McGill of the Royal Falkland Islands Police re-

plied as follows:

Our records show that there are 70 drivers in the Falklands that hold Public Service Vehicle licenses. Public Service Vehicle is defined in the Road Traffic Ordinance as, 'a motor vehicle constructed or adapted or in fact used for the carriage of more than definition shall preclude it from being also a hire car or taxi in the event that the vehicle plies for hire).

The same ordinance also states the authority having the power to grant a public service vehicle licence shall be the chief police officer

(Section 5(1)). The licence is renewable annually on 01 January of every year for a fee of £1.00 (Section 5 (3)). PSV 1 is taken by persons who drive vehicles with seating for more than 16 passengers such as a coach. PSV 2 is a competency test undertaken by persons who drive vehicles with seating for up to 17 such as the school bus.

The 'rules' regarding insurance relating to all motor vehicles are set out under section 9 and 43 of the Road Traffic Ordinance and section 6 of the Road Traffic (Provisional) Regulations Order.

If a taxi is carrying fare paying passengers on a road, that is a prescribed road under The Wearing of Seat Belts (Prescribed Roads) Regulations 1996, then the driver is responsible for ensuring that his own belt is applied and that of any person in his vehicle under the age of 14 years.

Adult passengers are responsible for ensuring that their belts are applied. This is true of any vehicle travelling in a 'seat belt

IS there any truth in the rumour the equipment from inside the Fox Bay Wool Mill is to be disposed of?



## Radio enthusiasts take it to the top

AMATEUR radio enthusiasts in the Falklands got together and celebrated their hobby at the weekend.

Keith Grimmer, Neil Rowlands and Donald Betts, travelled to Cape Pembroke Lighthouse to participate in the International Lighthouse and Lightship weekend which is held on the third weekend of August every year.

The event involves attempting to make contact by ham radio with other lighthouses throughout the world.

The Falklands is always very popular with other enthusiasts so a number of stations made contact.

Despite the wet and windy weather on August 16/17, a total of 776 stations were worked in 58 different countries: from a station in China, to one on the remote South Atlantic island of Tristan da Cunha.

This year's event involved 369 lighthouses in 48 different countries

Next year's event will take place on August 21/22.

The present cast iron lighthouse at Cape Pembroke was first built in 1854 having been imported from England.

However in 1905, due to crumbling foundations, it was taken down and rebuilt about 100 metres to the west on firmer ground.

It illuminated again in June 1907 and was in continuous operation until April 1982.

Being 22 meters high the light could be seen for 16 miles in clear weather

### Help for Murrell Farm - PN reports on the meeting of the TAC

THE continuing problem of the lack of a road to the Murrell farm was examined at Monday's meeting of the Transport Advisory Committee (TAC)

Councillor Stephen Luxton told Penguin News, "the progress since the last meeting was reported. This started with myself and the Economic Adviser meeting with the landowners to discuss options and their transport requirements.

"Island Shipping Ltd will shortly be conducting a trial run using a small boat (not a sea-truck) to determine the best route up the river and the best landing point for a sea-truck to deliver fuel and collect wool from the farm. "It is hoped this will take place in the next week or so. The Public Works Department (PWD) have not had sufficient time since the last meeting of TAC to prepare a properly costed set of road construction options for this meeting but will do so and return to the next meeting of TAC which is likely to be around November.

"As no resources were available for construction this season anyway, this will not cause any delay to anything that may subsequently be agreed at the following meeting."

Councillor Luxton said under Matters Arising, PWD advised that they had not prepared a report on the Terrazyme trial for this meeting due to it being so close to the last one, thus a report will be presented after the winter has finished.

He added. "The Roads Engineer advised that he had reconsidered what was a realistic expectation for road construction towards Dunbar and concluded that it was likely that around 10km would be built this season, out of a total of 17km, given the available funding and resources deployed.

"This will have no impact on the order of the construction programme on West Falkland, only on timing."

Councillor Luxton also raised the subject of the publication of funding information for different projects, "...something that has normally been kept in the exempt section and which was discussed in the last meeting of TAC.

"Given that a substantial portion of the Capital Programme is spent on Camp Roads, the Committee agreed that it was in the public interest to publish information regarding final funding allocation once it has been approved..." and so it will be published with the public minutes of this week's meeting in due course.

He added. "The actual consideration of funding bids must however remain in the exempt section as commercially confidential matters may arise in the discussion."

### Museum's 'tremendous' quiz night raises over £3,000

"We also been very well supported by local companies and individuals, with a large number of raffle prizes being donated and we are, obviously, very grateful to all them all."


The star prize was undoubtedly two return flights on FIGAS and this was won by Debbie Ford, although there were many other excellent prizes to be won.

### Fires, crashes and noxious fumes

### Rodrigo Cordeiro joins the Fire Service for their August training day

"FIRE TRAINING? Don't they just spend a couple of hours rolling and unrolling hoses?" Well, no, not quite.

In addition to their regular Wednesday night sessions, every two months members of the fire brigade gather for a day of challenging exercises designed to prepare them for every possible emergency; house fires to traffic accidents, aircraft crashes to cats stuck up trees (well, hedges in Stanley, but you get the point...)

Yours truly was lucky enough to oin the Fire Brigade for their August training day so that the PN centre pages remained filled for another week, and so they had someone to laugh at as the day grew colder and

The first part of the day's training consisted of exercises involving the use of breathing apparatus, the first of which included a simulation of a burning building, set up in the old World War II ammunitions dump (empty, mind) by the Canache.

Once inside the building the firefighters had to make their way through a warren of passages searching and retrieving charred dummies posing as casualties along their way, with a fire to extinguish at the end of

No sooner had the first exercise ended when the team was called upon to retrieve another casualty and an unconscious fire fighter from within the culvert running along the cem-etery and underneath the sea front.

Both casualties had hypothetically been stricken by noxious fumes, which will seem incredibly realistic to anyone who has ever stood downwind of some those pipes that run into the harbour.

#### RTA and a plane crash

A road traffic accident simulation was the first exercise of the afternoon. with fire fighters being called out to an incident involving two vehicles. Both vehicles had passengers trapped in them which had to carefully be removed from the wreckage

The authenticity of road traffic accident simulations is essential as, given the far from perfect conditions of roads in the Islands, the likelihood of the Fire Brigade having to attend a real accident scene is unfortunately

The final exercise of the day was centred on the staging of a mock small aircraft (as modelled by a deceased car) accident at Stanley Airport in conjunction with the airport fire

The exercise also involved the air traffic control tower staff (who coordinated the initial response to the incident), members of the emergency medical services (who administered

The task proved itself considerably demanding; few realise the precision and care taken in order to ensure the safe removal of all casualties from the scene as quickly as possi-ble, which of course is never quick enough when you're just watching enough tribing to take photos with hands that lost all feeling back at the traffic accident.

Nonetheless it was reassuring to see not only the competence, but also the confidence with which the fire team acted throughout the day; all the more impressive considering the large majority are part time fire fight-

The final exercise encapsulated what is perhaps the very essence and the biggest reward of fire-fighting: no, not the gratifying feeling of being directly involved in saving a person's life, but being able to use great big power tools that go through metal like a hot knife through butter.

One snip with the hydraulic pincers in a few strategic points and car roofs and doors are discarded like the proverbial orange peel.

## Hip and groin injuries

THE hip joint is formed by the thigh bone (Femur) and a socket in the Pelvic bone (Acetabulum)

This joint is deep and intrinsically solid and is reinforced by strong ligaments and controlled by the most powerful muscles in the body. This forms a very strong and stable ball and socket joint that is designed for heavy loading and high impact. This is a joint that is built for action and action is what it re-

Imagine the load transmitted through the Hip joint if you were to jump from a height landing on your feet, or the strain whilst running at speed and suddenly pivoting around to change direction.

In spite of the strong design there are, as usual, things that can and do go wrong

The following are some of the more common complaints that you may come across

#### Dislocated hip joints

This condition can occur in newborns, before the hip joints have developed fully.

It is not seen in adults without excessive trauma and is therefore usually associated with other severe injuries. Infants are checked for clicking hips before leaving hospital. This can be a sign that the joint is slipping or partially dislocating

Treatment is undertaken at that stage to lessen the opportunity for more serious conditions later in life. Often double nappies or sometimes a plaster cast is sufficient to hold the thighs out to the side and encourage the joint to deepen as it develops. Surgery is sometimes required but as a last resort.

#### Slipped Femoral Epiphysis

This is the slipping of the growth plate at the top end of the Femurand can sometimes occur in teenage years. Because this results in the top end of the Femur slipping on the shaft of the Femur. it is really much like a broken hip.

This is a serious condition that usually requires surgery to pin the bone back in the correct alignment. Fortunately, this tends not to be a very common problem.



#### Groin Strain

The buttock muscles that control the backward and outward movement of the hip are very strong, as they have to generate large amounts of power to propel us when we are running or jumping.

The muscles on the inner side of the hip joint and upper thigh (or groin) are not nearly as powerful and can be easily strained.

It is relatively common to tear these muscles at or near their origin at the base of the pelvis. This can occur commonly at sport when we are running or sliding, but can also occur in the less athletic members of the community by just slipping and twisting the leg out to the

The blood supply to the muscle at its attachment to the bone is not usually as good as the supply to the muscle belly. As a result, damage near this attachment often takes longer to heal.

That fact, plus the large strain that is transmitted through these muscles on movements of the leg. can mean that these injuries can be difficult to heal.

Rest. physiotherapy, progressive exercise and time will resolve most of these problems but occasionally a steroid injection may be required.

#### Bursitis

A bursa is like a fluid filled sack designed to pad out a tendon where it would otherwise rub on bone. We have several bursae around the hip and these can become inflamed

and tender - usually as a result of overuse. This condition usually settles with treatment and rest

#### Torn muscle

The most common muscle injuries that occur in this region, are the muscles that run from just above the hip joint and pass down the thigh to work on the knee. The hamstring group of muscles commonly tear at the back of the thigh just below the hip

The other frequent tear is the muscle that forms part of the quadriceps at the front of the thigh. It too, tears just below the level of the hip

These injuries occur under high loads and resolve with treatment and rest.

#### Osteo arthritis

This is one of the most common problems affecting the hip joint in the middle aged to elderly. The joint surface can wear as a result of use and or damage.

Can you imagine how many steps you would take in an average life span of 75 years? With each step the supporting leg transmits 2-3 times the body weight through that hip joint. That mechanical loading contributes to wearing of the joint surface plus the fact that the bones often become softer with

Another factor is circulation to the joint. It is not uncommon that the blood supply to the hip can decrease as the years go by and this will reduce the ability of the joint to repair and withstand the loads that are placed upon it. All these factors can lead to osteo arthritis.

This problem can often be controlled, although not cured, in the early stages.

Keeping the joint mobile and increasing the strength of the supporting muscle groups, will protect the joint. However if the joint is too badly worn and cannot be saved, the surgeons are able to replace it with a metal and synthetic artificial joint.

If you are suffering from longstanding hip pain or have had a recent substantial injury you should seek medical advice and treatment.

### Wool market report for week ending August 22

General Overview

FLEECE wool prices generally fell across the entire micron spectrum during trading last week. The mid and broad micron lots came under pressure early in the week but regained favour towards the end of selling to close only marginally lower.

Skirtings remained solid over the course of the weeks selling, as did locks and crutchings.

Once again better style types with good staple length and strength traded at significant premiums over other types. This could offer significant financial opportunities for the Falkland Islands "dry sheep" clip in the coming season.

58,000 bales are rostered for sale in Australia next week.

#### Two in five Latinamericans in poverty

SOME 220 million Latinamericans that is two out of five, in 2002 lived in poverty of which 95 million live miserably, according to the latest report from the United Nations Economic Commission for Latinamerica and the Caribbean. Cepal.

The report released in Cepal office in Santiago reveals that 43.4% of the region's population lives below the poverty line, an almost one percentage increase over 2001, while 18.8% of the poor live in indigence (so poor as tolack even necessities) compared to 18.2% the previous year.

The Social Review of Latinamerica 2002-2003 reveals that poverty indexes have remained constant for the last five years, since 1997.

"The only exception was 2000 when the good economic performance of the region helped reduce poverty by 4 million people." said Cepal Director Jose Antonio Ocampo who anticipated that in 2003 poverty will reach 43.9% of which 19.4% are indigent.

Although most countries of the region did not experience major changes. Argentina and Uruguay suffered considerably the drop into poverty

According to Cepal in urban Argentina poverty rocketed from 19.4 to 45.4%, while those living miserably trebled from 6.7 to 20.9%.

Uruguay also underwent an impoverishment process with the index in urban areas growing from 9.4 to 15.4%, although indigence remained rather stable at 2.5% of the whole population.

In the other extreme Mexico and Ecuador experienced a "perceptible" decrease in poverty percentages in urban areas comparing 2000 with 2002. In Mexico the reduction was 1.7% and in Ecuador 8% considered significant since in 1999. 64% of Ecuadorians lived in poverty.

Bolivia, Brazil, Colombia, Costa

Bolivia, Brazil, Colombia, Costa Rica, Panama and Venezuela remained flan or experienced a slight increase below one percent

increase below one percent.

Only Chile and Dominican Republic managed acceptable reductions in the percentage of people living in poverty, and seem in line to the goal of cutting poverty in 2015 by half as was agreed in the "Millennium Summit".

Regarding under nourishment, this is extensive to 11% of the regional population, 55 million, according to the UN Food Program. This is particularly serious with 9% of children and with 19.4% who suffer what is described as chronic under nourishment

However in spite of the impressive numbers, the under nourished population in the last decade dropped in 20 of the 24 countries of the region, indicated Mr. Ocampo.

#### Carrasco Airport in private hands

THE management of Uruguay's main international airport. Carrasco, will be in private hands for the next thirty years following this Wednesday public tender in Montevideo's Stock Exchange.

CerealSur a consortium of Argentine. American and Italian companies paid 34 million US dollars for the Carrasco airport concession that according to the tender conditions must become in five years time one of Mercosur best airports.

The members of the consortium are Aeropuerios Argentina 2000 already manages 32 air terminals in Argentina. American International Airports and Sea Milan that is re-

sponsible for several airports in Italy

The Carrasco concession extends for a first period of 20 years with a further 10 year option, and will demand infrastructure investments of over 150 million US dollars, plus an annual licence estimated in 2.5 million US dollars.

Boarding taxes must remain below 13 US dollars for the air shuttle Montevideo-Buenos Aires and in the range of 25/30 US dollars for international flights.

Carrasco airport has an annual turnover of over a million passengers, and currently operates as a supplier for the major hubs of Buenos Aires and Sao Paulo in Brazil.

#### USA's suggestions for Mr Kirchner

THE United States has suggested to Argentine president Nestor Kirchner, who provided a warm welcome to Fidel Castro last May and more recently to Venezuela's Hugo Chavez, that his administration reconsider the country's relative uncritical position towards Cuba.

Washington hopes Argentina "can adopt a position of leadership in the defence of human rights in Cuba", said Cuban born US Assistant Secretary for Western Hemisphere Affairs Roger Noriega

The Bush administration top diplomat for Latin American affairs met in Buenos Aires with Kirchner and other senior officials during a recent tour of several South American countries last week.

"We want to continue a discreet

dialogue with the Argentine government and its representative in the Organization of American States concerning how we can work together to find a constructive way to prepare for the transition following the dictatorship in Cuba." Mr. Noriega was quoted in reports published in the Buenos Aires press.

"It's a matter of conscience and we can't force decisions concerning this issue." added Mr. Noriega

Argentina this year abstained during the United Nations Human Rights Commission vote on Cuba reversing the position it held during the nineties. Under former presidents Carlos Menem and caretaker Eduardo Duhalde. Argentina voted for resolutions critical of the lack of basic rights under Castro's regime.

Yesterday Mr Simpkins added. "The investigation is now complete. The report of the Panel is awaited following which any recommendations will obviously receive very careful consideration.

### Falklands albatross 'endangered' species

THE decline in numbers of Black Browed Albatross has led to the birds being classified as 'endangered' by the World Conservation Union (IUCN).

Research revealed today by Birdlife International shows longline fishing is the prime factor responsible for greatly increasing the risk of extinction among at least five species of albatross.

The release of this information coincides with a workshop on seabirds in Cape Town, attended by Falklands Conservation representative scientist Nic Huin, which has revealed alarming declines in six more albatross species.

All 21 albatross species in the world are now considered to face extinction in the future, largely owing to illegal and unregulated longline fishing

The Black-browed Albatross' ICUN status dropped dramatically from 'near-threatened' in 2000, to 'vulnerable' in 2002, has now been reclassified as 'endangered', only two steps away from extinct

Eighty percent of the world's population of Black Browed Albatross live in the Falklands and over the past six years much of Nic Huin's work for Falklands Conservation has been the assessment and study of these birds

Conservation Officer Becky Ingham said. "... these birds will be extinct unless the trend can be reversed. Many in the Falklands feel that much is done to encourage safe fishing practices here and I would agree that we have a high level of precautions being taken within our own fishing industry to reduce bird

'However, this is not enough. We must all work together on an international level to stop the slide towards extinction.

Raising awareness

One of Britain's most experienced sailors, John Ridgway, who rowed the North Atlantic with round-the-world yachtsman Chay Blyth in 1966, is fast approaching South Africa on his year-long yacht expedition to report illegal fishing and campaign for stricter action against such operations.

Ridgway's expedition will be joined for the Falklands leg in January by Falklands Conservation's

Tim Reid.

### **NVQ** problem solved

THE Director of Human Resources has allayed fears of residents who believed their National Vocational Qualifications (NVQ) could be declared void.

Director of Human Resources Kathleen Dobbyns confirmed that work by a small number of individuals towards high level NVQs has been discovered to be invalid. however their efforts will now be recognised with an alternative award

Ms Dobbyns explained yesterday that a problem had been discovered, ...with the award of NVOs at Levels 4 and 5 in Management and in Training and Development, where it had been hoped that these could be achieved for a small number of people in the Falklands, through Business Link in the United Kingdom.

She reassured individuals who have successfully completed Level 1 - 3 NVQs through the Falkland Islands Government Training Centre that, "...there is no problem whatsoever.

She said the problem lay only with the provision of NVQs at the higher levels and, "...it transpired that it was not possible for a UK based organisation to deliver NVQs to candidates if they are not resident in the UK.

Ms Dobbyns added that work undertaken towards the Level 4 and 5 NVQs will not be in vain.

She explained, "Equivalent certificates will be issued by the Chartered Management Institute and these will be at Certificate in Management and Diploma in Manage-

"NO brilliance is needed in the law. Nothing but common sense, and relatively clean finger nails.

I don't know about the clean fingernails, but our lawmakers displayed a fair weight of common sense in a decision made at last week's Executive and Legislative Council meetings.

I'm not alluding, although it's great news, to the authorities' effort to find what appears to be a solution to the dilemma facing racing fanatics a possible land swap to allow the racecourse to remain at its current

location.

I am instead referring to the decision to relax the building regulations -

the government has listened to the people.

Although it won't be an easy process to go through, after all the Planning Committee remains bound by the regulations, the fact that individuals can now appeal for case by case relaxation of the controls is

wonderful news.

We've all heard the horror stories of individuals being instructed to clad one side of their home in a material completely different from the rest of the house because the area is less than the required distance from the boundary. This type of hassle, along with the kind of rules that say you can't build a garage less than five metres from the road have led a number of people's plans for home improvements to bite the dust.

I do realise that most of these laws exist in the interests of safety but Islanders are, in general, not an unsafe lot and have traditionally con-

structed homes that are built to last.

In a letter to Penguin News earlier this year, Ailsa Heathman wrote, "The houses on Drury Street and Pioneer Row were some of the first to be built in Stanley, all very close together, and they are still standing despite the perils of the Falklands wind, sheds full of peat and drums of hot ashes which were used to burn the household rubbish."

This move by LegCo is the first step in reducing the level of bureaucracy which many were concerned was leading us to become a "little

England."

I FEEL I should respond to Councillor Summers comment (right) at LegCo that FCO official Paul Davies may have been 'misquoted or partially quoted when discussing a possible visit to the Islands by Argentine President, Nestor Kirchner.

I was present at Lisa Riddell's interview with Mr Davies and I feel confident the reporting of the exchange in Penguin News was accurate.

Whether the gentleman should have said what he did (particularly if it was a personal comment) is not really our concern.

#### Councillors 'don't anticipate a visit' from President Kirchner

COUNCILLOR Mike Summers has disassociated himself from the re-marks made by, "...the recently visiting gentleman from the Foreign Office about the possible visit (to the Falklands) from the President of Argentina," for the unveiling ceremony of an Argentine Memorial to be built in Darwin.

Nevertheless Mr Summers said he hoped, "\_the monument is built relatively soon and I hope this is a successful project.

In his motion for adjournment speech to the Legislative Council last Friday, August 29, Mr Summers said, "I don't anticipate a visit from the President of Argentina. The approach of the current Argentine government towards the Falkland Islands is not entirely satisfactory in that it seems to be their intention to disregard us as a gov-

Councillor Summers was referring to remarks from Paul Davies, head of the Foreign Office CO South Atlantic Section Overseas Territories Department who in a recent familiarisation visit to Falklands said, "...if President Kirchner wants to visit, (Falklands), it would be an astonishing display for putting things behind him." suggesting that Councillors should. ... think in terms of saying yes," since it could help, "...move on," the relationship with Argentina. However Mr Davies also underlined that, "I think there are rather a few hurdles to overcome before we go down that route.

In mid August President Nestor Kirchner told Argentine press after a meeting with 1982 Falklands war veterans that the Argentine government would grant financial support and he. "...looked forward to attending the unveiling ceremony," of the Argentine Memorial at Darwin when it is completed.

Councillor Summers emphasised to the Legislative Council, "I understand that he (Mr Davies) was making personal comment and. I

equally understand that he may have been either misquoted or partially quoted in the newspapers. But you don't see reports like that without there being some kind of substance in terms of what the gentleman said."

When interviewed by Penguin News last month, Mr Davies indicated that a President Kirchner visit to the Falklands would be beneficial as, "...they are your nearest and biggest neighbour, and neighbours usually get on well. Neighbours usually work together to do things for each other's good: anything that could be translated into making that work for the Falklands would be worthwhile exploring.

Councillor Summers, further underlining dissatisfaction with the current approach of the Argentine government towards the Falklands indicated, "...that's fine as long as there is nothing to talk about, but actually there are some important issues to talk about, high seas fishing issues in particular. And, I hope that when we do come to discuss those and, indeed issues of the Continental shelf of the Falkland Islands. we will be fully represented in those discussions

Finally, Mr Summers said he hoped the Memorial project is a success and that, "...whoever comes to open it will be a matter. I think, for careful handling and for us to determine. But I don't anticipate a visit from the President of Argen-

Councillor Jan Cheek supported Mr Summers' speech in the Legislative Council saying that it was an understatement, "...when he (Mr Summers) said the approach of the Argentine government was somewhat unsatisfactory. However, it's something we are going to have to live with until they have a government which is sufficiently mature to recognise us as neighbours, rather than potential prey." MP/PN

#### DoA: please look after Stanley Common

THE Department of Agriculture has appealed to users of Stanley Common to consider others.

Mandy McLeod told Penguin news, "There has been a steady increase in the occasions where gates have been left open on the common, in particular the ones by the rugby pitch and Sappers Hill.

"At this time of year it doesn't create too much of a problem because livestock tends to be wintered elsewhere, but horses will soon be coming back in, and an unexpected loose horse or two on the Stanley Bypass can be a hazardous situation, for both horses and motor-

Mrs McLeod added that motorists on the common should take care to avoid damaging tracks through gates.

She said the tracks. "...and the immediate surrounding areas can become muddy very quickly, purely through normal use. If you are taking a vehicle onto the common, be considerate and limit the amount of running around you do in the first few hundred yards of entry.

"There's a load of room out there for fun, so there is no excuse for churning up the gateways and the immediate areas (the rugby pitch has taken a bit of a battering and looks very unsightly).

"Enjoy the common, it's great to see it being used, but remember that others like to enjoy it too - and please shut the gates.

### Bullying led man to 'snap' Ag/Minerals merger confirmed

On August 21. Mr Ross had not been working; he had a few drinks with friends in his room and then went to the Turners Bar and the Top Naafi.

Mr Ross had become aware of Mr Constantine and Ms Benjamin and there had been an exchange of words.

He left the bar and went to the kitchen in which he worked feeling, "...upset and angry at the hatred." directed at himself and his girlfriend by Mr Constantine and Ms Benjamin. His friend David Batty became concerned and followed Mr Ross to the kitchen

Mr Ross took an eight inch kitchen knife and told Mr Batty he was. "...going to scare Constantine." Mr Batty told him put the knife down." to which Mr Ross replied "I'm going to stab him.

When Mr Batty attempted to stop Mr Ross from leaving, Mr Cripps said the defendant placed the tip of the knife to Mr Batty's chest. Mr Batty, fearing for his own safety, allowed him to leave.

Mr Cripps said that while walking back to the Top Naafi, Mr Ross calmed down, "... thought better of it." and put the knife in his pocket before going into the Dolphin Club and sitting with friends

He was soon approached by police who had been alerted by Mr

Mr Ross immediately took the knife out and placed it on the ground. He was arrested and taken into custody.

Defence lawyer Richard Marlor told the court that Mr Ross had at first worked at the Four Seasons mess but had moved to Turners because the chef there was receivharassment from Constantine and Ms Benjamin.

Mr Ross had endured two months of harassment and screaming abuse at work until he had finally. "...snapped for one instant. but soon regained composure.

Mr Marlor said Mr Ross cooperated with the police at all times and a custodial sentence should not be seen as, "...appropriate in this case

He concluded, "The abuse Mr Ross has had to suffer and being here (in court) is punishment cnough

After a brief adjournment. Justice of the Peace. Tim Blake fined Mr Ross £150 for each charge plus prosecution costs of £70, totalling £370

Regarding the harassment Mr Ross had suffered at work. Mr Blake said, "...because of this case, employers should move to improve conditions

"Should harassment continue, go to your employer and make an official complaint.

## ExCo: news from meeting held August 27

### Sigma contract gets go ahead Racecourse future discussed

THE offer submitted by Sigma Marine Ltd for operation of a fishery patrol vessel has been accepted by the government and, it is hoped, a contract will be signed on September 17.

In a report to Executive Council. Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins, said he had contacted both Sigma Marine and Starline, who operates the *Polar Prince*, "...in an effort to secure 'best value' in respect of the service."

Mr Simpkins said. "Starline originally quoted £4,500 per day for a two year contract. Subsequently, they reduced this figure to £3,600 per day for a three year contract."

Sigma Marine originally quoted £3.800 per day for a three year contract with an increase to £4.100 per day if four en-suite cabins were to be provided as required by the government of South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands (SGSSI).

Mr Simpkins said, "A penalty of £375,000 would have been imposed if the contract were terminated by FIG after two years.

"Following negotiations, Sigma quoted £3.800 per day to include

four en-suite cabins based on a three year contract.

"SGSSI have agreed to hire the vessel from FIG for the whole of third year (sic) if FIG do not require any use in that year. SGSSI are not prepared to enter into a separate contract with Sigma Marine for the third year.

"A separate agreement between FIG and SGSSI is therefore to be completed to cover this point."

He concluded. "On the basis of hire charges only. Starline is cheaper by £219,000 over three years, assuming 365 days per year usage. However, fuel usage of the two vessels is markedly different with the Sigma being much more economical.

"A theoretical annual estimate of operating speeds and fuel usage was prepared which revealed additional fuel costs for the *Polar Prince* of £1.131m over three years.

"Since this figure clearly vastly exceeds the daily hire cost advantage offered by Starline, all consultees agreed that the offer submitted by Sigma Marine Limited should be accepted."

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL considered a number of planning and environmental items at its meeting held last week, including a possible solution for the racecourse problem.

The future of Stanley racecourse in its current form has been uncertain as the end of the lease looms for the land on which it

Acting Governor. Harriet Hall explained ExCo gave agreement in principal to start discussions with the Falkland Islands Company and a member of the public over. The possible development of sites currently under the three different ownerships for housing in West Stanley.

"This would help meet Stanley's projected need for housing and also make it possible to retain Stanley Racecourse in its current location."

Ms Hall added. "A fuller assessment of technical and financial aspects will be needed as the plan will entail construction of a new road to West Stanley and will also involve a 'land swap' between FIG and FIC."

Douse, the Conservation Strategy Officer, as a member of the Environmental Committee and considered the proposed designation of these Network Parks.

three National Parks.

Ms Hall said, "Members considered carefully a number of factors. These included access to the proposed areas, government's liability in the case of accidents to people in designated areas, the costs associated with National Parks.

Parks.
"They also took account of the views expressed by the public at the meetings and in correspondence. One of their main concerns was the possible cost to Government as a result of designation.

"They decided not to designate two areas - Wickham Heights and Hill Cove Forest. However they supported in principle only at this stage the designation of Hill Cove Mountains as a national park and asked for more work to be done on costings, including the production of a 'no cost' option."

#### Government moratorium on PRPs to end

THE Government will lift its moratorium on applications for Permanent Residence Permits (PRP).

The moratorium was imposed last year as a result of the possible economic consequences of the decline in fishing licence revenue.

Acting Governor, Harriet Hall, commented, "Happily, the economic situation of the Islands is now more positive and councillors decided that there was therefore no need to maintain the moratorium."

Executive Council (ExCo) did however consider. "...it would be

important to explain fully the factors, which are taken into account when considering the granting of PRPs

"These include an assessment of the applicants involvement and commitment to the local community and whether or not the applicant has skills which are needed on the Islands.

"They asked for a revised application form and guidance notes to be prepared for discussion at the September ExCo."

#### First licence fees for next year decided

COUNCILLORS have decided on licence fees for the first fishing season next year.

Harriet Hall explained, "Following advice from the Renewable Resources Assessment Group in London, who are the Government's advisers on fisheries conservation and management and discussions in

the Fisheries Committee, they decided on a level of fees for a variety of licence types.

"Most of these showed no increase from this year's prices. However 'C' type Loligo licences are to increase by 5% and 'F' type Skate licences will increase by 2%."

#### FLH managment changes

CHANGES to the management structure of Falklands Landholdings have been approved by Executive Council.

In a paper presented to ExCo last week, the Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins, recommended:

- the current General Manager be offered a new contract to expire on 31 July 2004.
- the current Operations Manager be appointed General Manager with effect from August 1, 2004 on local terms to be negotiated by the Chief Executive following consultation with the Chairman of the Board of Falklands Landholdings, and
- with effect from 1 August 2004, the post of Operations Manager be deleted from the establishment of Falklands Landholdings.

### Looking back at meat prices fifteen years on

I REFER to the previous two weeks of Penguin News and in particular the letters from Eric Goss and Riki Evans regarding the cost of mutton and the effect of the abattoir/Falkland Islands Meat Com-

I thought the following would be of interest to readers taken from the July 29th, 1988 issue of PN.

Below are extracts from an article/advert from the then proprietor of the butchery, Mr Gardner Fiddes. I believe he was trying to indicate why he would have to increase the cost of meat per lb to

"Cost based on 30 sheep:

Purchase price per head £6.80 = £204.00; Droving charge from supplier to Moody Valley per head £2.00 = £60.00. Min droving time cost from Moody Valley to Abattoir = £11.50, Incidental expense dog food = £16 00: Humane killing - wages 2 men per 8 Hour day =£61.50 Sub total £353.00

Delivery to household - wages for 2 men = £61 50: Diesel costs for delivery £10 00 Total £424.50

The above costs do not include water, electricity, equipment/materials, leases, cartridges and the proprictor's salary."

Prices at the time were £2.50 for a fore quarter (10lbs) and £4.32 for a hind (12lbs) which indicated that it cost £14.15 to get the meat to your kitchen for a return of £13.32. An increase was suggested of £4.00 and £7.80 respectively.



### Play field is children's inheritance

IN recent years I have heard the King George V Memorial Playing Field referred to as the Saint Mary's Playing Field and just to put the record straight on its correct name and the history surrounding it I thought that I would impart this information through the medium of your paper to remind present and future administrators, law makers, historians etc., that since July 21, 1938 that parcel of land rightly belongs to the children of the Falkland Islands.

The story began on June 3, 1936 when the British Prime Minister addressed the nation on the subject of an institution throughout the United kingdom and Colonies of the Playing Fields for children in memory of King George V.

Later that month an cleven member committee (of whom Jane and Sukey Cameron's father was one), chaired by the Colonial Secretary, was appointed in Stanley for the purpose of recommending a site and of raising the necessary funds in order that a memorial of this nature might be established in the Falkland Islands.

Two years later, although some funds had been raised, the Committee had been unable to obtain a suitable site but on July 21, 1938 Governor Henniker-Heaton (Jane and Sukey's grandfather) suggested they use the plot of land known as Old School Green on Saint Mary's Walk which was unanimously agreed as most suitable for the purpose and the work of putting the playing field in order was proceeded with almost immediately.

At that time, the amount in the fund was £282 and the estimate necessary to create the field complete with all necessary play-ground apparatus including ornamental gates was £1.000. (This sum equated to the cost of building two houses in Stanley at that time)

The committee then appealed to the general public for subscriptions towards defraying the costs. "... of a playing field which the children of the Colony will always have as their own as a memorial to the King."

A total of £564 was raised and credited to the fund with the Gov-

ernment Savings Bank and, after paying for the levelling of the site and the ordering from the UK of two pre-cast stone panels intended for each side of the entrance gate, the sum of £275 was left in the Bank.

World War Two interrupted any further developments and the Stanley children continued to play on it always referring to it as 'The Green' although during the war years the Agricultural Department had hay stacks on the east end which were a great asset for us kids to play on, and during the early years of the army garrison, canteen and cookhouse facilities were built there in the form of Nissen huts.

By July of 1946 the Colonial Secretary's office was again asking for ideas on how to complete the project. I began work shortly thereafter and lost track of proceedings but I do know that the stone castings were still stored in the Government Central Store mid 1960.

The lads of Naval Party 8901 (Royal Marines) kindly erected the first fence around the field and set up playing apparatus but I do not know who authorised the Government to site the Electricity Sub Stations on the east end of the field in recent years.

The facilities offered on the field today are a credit to the community and much appreciated but, children of Stanley, never forget that the field is yours in perpetu-

As for spam, maybe everyone should forward all of the spam emails we receive to Emma

Edwards (C&W Customer Services Manager) at emma.edwards@cwfi.co.fk so that she can get a true idea of the extent of the problem.

It is no exaggeration to say that many Islanders are receiving in excess of twenty spam emails per day, with some addresses receiving significantly more.

Finally, the suggestion in the response that users should press the unsubscribe' link on spam emails to have their names removed from mailing lists is naive.

When you unsubscribe from unscrupulous spam sites (which most of them are), you are just confirming that your email address is active, and are inviting ever more spam.

REGARDING the response from Cable and Wireless to questions about spam last week, on no account should spam be responded to in any way whatsoever.

This includes clicking the "unsubscribe" link at the bottom. All clicking this will do is confirm your email address to the spammers and make matters worse.

The only mail you can unsubscribe is from solicited email such as newsletters from reputable companies, where you have registered beforehand to receive it.

The best thing to do with spam is delete it immediately, preferably with the preview pane in your email client turned off as many spam emails have code in the body which will confirm your address to the spammers when previewed.

As indicated in the response from Cable and Wireless, there are a number of good products which can help you control spam, but none are 100% effective and can result in lost emails if not handled carefully.

"Therefore it is in the public's interest to obey the signs and not to enter the beach"

### It's all change at the Leisure Centre

SEPTEMBER 1 signalled the start of a new era for the Stanley Leisure Centre.

Following five years at the Centre. St John Payne is moving to join the team at Customs and Immigration. Steve Dent. who was until recently, the Physical Education and Business Studies teacher at the Community School becomes Leisure Centre Manager, leading a team which will shortly be brought up to strength to develop new activities.

Work is underway on the swimming pool. A large project, managed by Energise FI Ltd. it has brought a group of six swimming pool specialists from Chilean firm Hidragua Piscineria to carry out extensive repairs and maintenance as approved by Executive Council in February 2003.

Director of Education Sylvia Cole explained. "The plant room is being modernised and new, easilyset and monitored, controls are being fitted.

"The pumps are being replaced and the pool filtration system is being cleaned, replaced in parts, and updated. Tiles are being cleaned and re-grouted and the work, when completed, should repair a number of years of maintenance neglect."

Addressing recent problems with a low pool temperature. Mrs Cole said. "No guarantee has been given that this extensive work will increase pool temperatures but, with the installation of modern plant and a new control system, there are expectations of increased efficiency which could lead to higher, more stable, water temperatures."

In addition to this work, the inside of the pool has been cleaned

and redecorated with purlins and girders de-rusted and treated, and special paint and varnish applied to surfaces.

Mrs Cole said. "Iain Thom and his team from Soltaire should be congratulated on the excellent improvements which have taken place. The Public Works Department has also repaired a cracked window above the pool.

"This has, so far, been an effective team effort."

She added, "Work on the pool is on-going. It will be at least another fortnight before the maintenance work is completed. After that, all areas will be cleaned and the pool will slowly be re-filled."

It could then be another two weeks before the pool water is up to temperature.

"This is difficult to forecast at the moment but users will be kept informed."

Mrs Cole expressed her gratitude to pool users, "...for their ongoing patience.

"Most people appreciate that such major works can only be carried out during an extensive closure period."

She added she would. "...like to remind users that the other Leisure Centre facilities are still open - why not try a game of short tennis or aerobics instead?"

A PERSON is not liable to make a Retirement Pensions contribution if their gross earnings do not exceed £160.00 per week, confirmed Councillor Mike Summers at Legislative Council.

'Today, we have been discussing with the Chief Executive a review of the project management process and also a review of statement of requirements from each department to make sure that we are actually getting value

"It seems extraordinary to me that identical projects in the private and the public sector can vary by anything up to 400 and 500%, which is absolutely ridiculous.

Councillor Norma Edwards said she could not believe the costs quoted for the elderly ward, "are real, even

She added. "It's a shame that we have to go back time and again and reassess these things, which delays it more and more. However, I am hopeful that by the next time we are in this house there will be some firm decisions made and something will be done towards it

Councillor Jan Cheek agreed: "I share my colleague's disappointment regarding the delay which is now inevitable on the residential accommodation for the elderly

"But I hope the working group to be set up by the Chief Executive will be able to get to grips very quickly with coming up with a realistic price for an essential facility."



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#### Legislative Council Bills

#### £3 million extra expenditure

ADDITIONAL expenditure of almost £3 million has been approved for the current financial year

Introducing the Supplementary Appropriation 2003/2004 Bill. Financial Secretary Derek Howatt said. "The purpose of this bill is to authorise the withdrawal of the additional sum of £2.938.220 from the Consolidated fund, to meet supplementary expenditure approved by the Standing Finance Committee this morning (Friday, August 29) for the current financial year.

'Apart from £6,000 required to cover the estimated cost of holding a by-election, the supplementary funding represents carry-overs of under-spends from the previous fi-

nancial year.

Mr Howatt continued. "The carry-overs, which I suggest are too numerous to mention individually. consist of commitments for which it is expected payment will need to be made in this financial year

There are nine Operating Budget items totalling £429,510, five Transfer Payment items totalling £269,480 and thirty-eight Capital Budget items, mainly in respect of construction projects, totalling £2,233,230.

Mr Howatt said he was pleased to report an, "...actual surplus of revenue over expenditure for 2002/03 amounts to £5.2 million, compared to the original estimate of £2.3 million This improvement of £2.9 million, therefore covers the Sup-plementary Expenditure requested."

#### Work permits: employers must justify recruitment

A BILL which, "...makes amendments to the provisions in relation to grant of work permits," was passed by Legislative Council on Friday

The Chief Executive, Mr Chris Simpkins explained the bill, "...enables the Principal Immigration Officer to require employers to advertise vacancies before he considers an application for a work permit and it will also require employers to satisfy the Principal Immigration Officer that Falkland Islands residents. having applied for the vacancy, are not suitable to fill it before a work permit will be issued."

Councillor Summers commented. "I am sure that the large majority of Councillors and a large majority of the public will have thought that this

was already the case

Would the Chief Executive explain whether we, in fact, have been doing this already and this simply regularises the position, or have we been mistaken all along

Mr Simpkins replied that this was the case. He added, "This does regularise a practice which has been applied for sometime but indeed provides clear powers for the Principal Immigration Officer.

Building Control change

Legislative Council has agreed certain provisions of the Building Control Ordinance can be relaxed.

The Chief Executive explained. this Bill provides a process whereby a building – or parts of a building, if you like – can be exempted from the control that is currently imposed by the Building Control Ordinance 1994 It will introduce a process for the relaxation of provisions of the Ordinance in certain circumstances

"As such, it responds to expressions of concern, which had been made to the Government in recent months, regarding the necessity for the full force of the building regulations to be applied.

Endangered Species Protection Bill

Also passed on Friday was the Endangered Species Protection Bill, which provides, "... protection of protection of endangered, endemic and indigenous species of animals and plants and regulates the trade in endangered species," was passed by Legislative Council on Friday.

Also passed was the Companies Auditor's Bill which Mr Simpkins said enabled, "...partnerships and corporate bodies to be appointed as auditors as well as individual partners. as at present.

# The role of the Practice Nurse

THE Practice Nurse works from 8,30-5pm Monday to Friday.

To promote the best use of time. each day is split up into sections to address different health issues. They are as follows:-

08.30-09.30-Mon-Fri. Blood taking. If you are given a form from your doctor or are asked to come for a test you can come in any day at this time.

Beware though, on Thursdays this time is for Warfarin blood clinic so you may have to wait a little longer

09.30-12-Mon-Fri. This is the general clinic. This includes advice on weight loss, blood pressure monitoring, injections, wound dressings, ear syringing and a variety of other things

If you are in doubt as to whether your particular problem or query is appropriate for this clinic, you can ask the reception staff when you make an appointment or ring the nurse direct to enquire (27330).

Monday afternoon - Well Woman Clinic. During this clinic cervical screening is done.

Any women due for one of these tests is sent a letter in advance by Rachel at Reception and given an appointment time in this

Anyone wishing to change their appointment or who wish a particular GP to do the test can do so by ringing Rachel on 27328.

Results from this clinic normally take about twelve weeks and letters are sent out with the results.

Tuesday afternoon - Coronary Heart Disease Clinic This clinic is for anyone who has already experienced some sort of problem with their heart, for example Angina or a "heart attack

It's an 'MOT' clinic where we check cholesterol, height, weight. blood pressure and give advice on lifestyle.

We already have records of who is eligible for this clinic and in due course you will receive a letter and be invited to attend.

Wednesday afternoon - Drug Monitoring Clinic. In this clinic people who take certain types of medication that do occasionally have side effects or may affect certain organs of the body are invited to attend to have a blood test to check everything is well

Thursday afternoon Medicals. These appointments are for people requiring medicals, for example immigration, diving, fly-

These appointments also correspond with an appointment with

Friday - Administration. A chance to catch up on all the paperwork from the week, letting people know their results and preparing for the next weeks clinics!!

Camp Visits. Once a month on a Wednesday. I will be doing a rotating schedule of camp visits. These are to Fox Bay. Port Howard and Hill Cove.

They are arranged in advance by Rachel in Reception through the settlement manager, and anyone wishing to be seen can make appointments with that person or ring us direct

# Recipes for the Falkland Islands **Tasty Breakfast Burritos**

BAKED tortillas, packed with sausage, cheese and eggs, swimming in a hearty sausage gravy (Serves 6)

#### Ingredients

1 cup milk

2 pounds pork sausage 12 eggs, beaten Ix 4oz can chopped green chilli peppers (optional) 8 x 10inch flour tortillas 8 ozs cheddar cheese, grated I teaspoon all purpose flour

#### Directions

Place sausage in a large, deep pan. Cook over medium high heat until evenly brown.

Drain, reserving 2 tablespoons of drippings; set sausage aside. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175

degrees C). Add the eggs and green chillis to the pan: cook, stirring occasionally, until eggs are scrambled and

Lightly grease a 9x13 inch bak-

Place the tortillas on a counter top or other clean surface Cover

each tortilla with portions of sausage, cheese and eggs.

Roll up the tortillas and place them seam side down in the baking dish.

Heat reserved sausage drippings in the skillet. Sprinkle on the flour and stir.

Add milk, stirring constantly, until the gravy begins to thicken. Pour the gravy on top of the tortilla rolls.

Bake in preheated oven for 10 to 15 minutes, until gravy is bub-











# Wool market report for week ending August 29

#### GENERAL Overview

Greasy wool prices rose significantly at sales in Australia and New Zealand last week.

Price rises were of magnitude 5 to 10 pence per kilogram clean for fleece wool lots finer than 26 micron and 1 to 2 pence per kilogram clean for broader lots.

Good length skirtings were also reported to have attracted solid buying interest with gains of up to 5 to 10 pence per kilogram clean while locks and crutchings remained firm.

According to the Wool Record Weekly, main buying interest for the finer combing wools came from Western Europe while Australasia. Western Europe and the Middle East purchased most of the broader types

British Quotations for Tops

British top quotations reflected the greasy wool markets of the world, with quotations rising for all micron categories.

#### Australian Market

In total 53.752 bales of wool were offered for sale during the week, with 47.831 bales purchased by the trade. Pass in rate averaged 11.0%.

Included in the offering were 4.127 bales of crossbred wool, of which 3.648 bales were sold. (pass in rate 11.4%)

#### Auctions next week

51,000 bales are rostered for sale in Australia and 12,500 bales in New Zealand.

#### Lan Express under investigation

THE Magallanes Region Economic Prosecutor Office has been requested to investigate Lan Express and its affiliates' unilateral decisions regarding the manipulation and delivery of overseas freight destined to Punta Arenas.

Apparently the normal procedure was for Lan Express to deliver air remittances at a Punta Arenas Port Authority downtown depot, where after paying a, "...reasonable," fee for customs, custody and other related services, interested parties could pick up the consignment of goods

However according to Prosecutor Fred Facusse, Lan Express has lately decided that all remittances are deposited in a new airport warehouse apparently belonging to an affiliate of Lan Chile, with custody and document costs far higher than with the previous system. Besides if the local businessman wants the merchandise delivered to the Punta Arenas port depot, Lan Express will charge an additional, and "hefty", transport fee.

Punta Arenas Port Authority has also been involved in the dispute, since they claim that local importers (approximately 90 businesses) are demanding that merchandise and parcels be delivered in the port depot, and not in the airport warehouse.

The investigation was officially started August 12, and Lan Express should be reporting to the Economic Prosecutor Office late this

Meantime in Santiago a member of the Congressional Extreme Zones Committee anticipated that a bill demanding, "... maximum transparency," regarding rates and occupancy percentages, "...from airlines operating in no competition markets." is being drafted.

It seems that most passengers from Magallanes and Aysén are under the impression they pay the highest rates or are exposed to the highest costs," indicated Deputy Rodrigo Alvarez, adding that is was essential that all information regarding rates, flights and different categories. "...should be open and made public.

Mr Alvarez said that the Extreme Zones Committee currently holding hearings on the Chilean domestic air passenger and freight markets is considering the opening of "limited competition" domestic routes to foreign airlines, without demanding any reciprocity.

"Our objective is simply fair competition and better conditions for passengers," underlined Congressman Alvarez.

#### Brazil fears failure in the WTO Cancun round

BRAZIL fears that the coming World Trade Organization meeting scheduled for next week in Mexico could end as happened with the 1999 Seattle summit, as one of the worst trade round failures ever, according to Ambassador Colodoaldo

"Indeed there's a serious risk of a new Seattle," indicated Mr. Hugueney who is Brazil's leading trade negotiator in the WTO.

The risk that Cancun might end up like the Seattle meeting, without an agreement or a final release, comes from the fact that, "...absolutely nothing has happened during the last eighteen months regarding development or agriculture agreements or understandings.

Since the last WTO summit in Doha when it was decided that development and agriculture are the priorities, no advances have been reached particularly regarding agriculture that Brazil considers vital.

The big clash as has been for the last decades will be between the developing countries exporters of agriculture commodities and the United States and European resistance to eliminate subsidies and farm protectionism.

"Negotiations will be particularly complex and nerve racking because of the deadline." added Ambassador Hugueney.

Last week Brazil together with India and China as leaders of a group of twenty countries. G 20. presented an agriculture liberalization counter proposal to an earlier proposal from the United States and the European Union.

According to the Brazilian press this document is, "...the maximum concession," Brazil is prepared to concede.

#### Joint naval exercises in the Beagle Channel

ARGENTINE and Chilean naval units began five days of joint exercises in the Beagle Channel on Tuesday in the extreme south of the continent on, an area where border disputes had both countries on the brink of war back in 1978.

A last minute personal appeal from Pope John Paul II to the two countries then military dictators managed to decompress the situation that finally found a diplomatic course when democracy and civilian rule was restored in Argentina

According to Chilean Navy sources the objective of the fifth edition of the "Viekaren" exercise is, "...confidence building," and to strengthen the "friendly links" between both countries' navies.

Members of Parliament are also interested in the diplomatic and institutional consequences of the incident that was described by Uruguayan Foreign Affairs Minister Didier Opertti as a. "...legal, political and diplomatic." issue which the country must address and defend its rights.

During the first of the three week incident, the Uruguayan government claimed jurisdiction over the fleeing Uruguayan flagged longliner which was ordered to return to Montevideo after an Australian fisheries patrol vessel allegedly sighted Viarsa I poaching in Australian waters.

With the help of South African and Falklands vessels Viarsa I was finally boarded, arrested and now is being escorted to Australia where she will face formal charges.

Uruguayan officials have repeatedly requested Australian authorities that the Uruguavan scientific observer onboard Viarsa 1 and his documentation regarding the catch be let ashore in the nearest port.

Mr Opertti revealed that this week he will be meeting the Australian Ambassador in Buenos Aires. (also the ambassador to Montevideo) to analyze the situation: "...whether Australians acted according to the rule of the law. or. "...in an abusive interpretation of international law.

Uruguay, as well as Australia and South Africa are full members of Convention for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources (CCAMLR), an organisation responsible for the allocation of fishing quotas in Antarctic waters including the very valuable and much poached toothfish.

#### Mercosur and EU will continue negotiations

THE European Union and Mercosur will continue negotiations leading to an association agreement including free trade. "...immediately after," the World Trade Organization meeting scheduled for next week in Cancun. Mexico according to a spokesperson from the European Commis-

Both blocks are interested in a ministerial meeting to agree on the next round of talks to conclude negotiations.

Originally the EU had proposed meeting with Mercosur August 28, before the Cancun summit, but towards the end of July both sides agreed it would be, "...more useful." to postpone the event until after the WTO meeting, said Pascal Lamy European Trade Commissar.

"We're working on a date for negotiators to meet in Brussels and agree on the schedule of trade rounds," said Mr Lamy

The European Commission is still waiting for Mercosur to deliver the matching proposal for the government purchases issue.

Since 2000 the European Union and Mercosur are negotiating an association agreement with the purpose of strengthening political dialogue, cooperation and market liberalization.

The first two chapters have been almost reached but the trade negotiation was frozen in 2002.

However since then the process has been more encouraging and both sides have presented proposals in all trade chapters leading to greater market access in the two blocks.

The new timetable for concluding the negotiations is now the Third Latinamerican, Caribbean, European Summit scheduled to take place May 2004 in Mexico

#### US visas mean flights to Europe fully booked

EXTREME security measures in United States airports and the cost of visas, even when in transit, has massively diverted Mercosur passengers to Europe.

Mercosur airlines had an unexpectedly excellent August and are fully booked until mid October according to local tourist operators.

Lan Chile, Pluna, Varig and Aerolineas Argentinas have waiting lists for those wishing to travel to Europe, while traffic to the United States has fallen dramatically.

The 100 US dollars visa plus the additional paperwork, and some difficult attitudes in US consular offices are attracting a growing number of passengers to Europe.

Besides, what has proved particularly irritating for many travellers is the need for a visa even when in transit at any US airport.

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

# Two names for Camp seat Goss and Hansen begin the by-election race

THE resignation of Camp councillor Philip Miller becomes effective at the end of this month and two men have this week indicated they will stand for election in his place.

When contacted by Penguin News this week. Ian Hansen of Main Point Farm and Eric Goss of Stanley both confirmed their intention to stand for the vacant Camp seat, in a by-election expected to take place in early November.

Ian Hansen yesterday told *Penguin News* he is "99% certain" he will stand in the Camp by-election.

He said his main motivation to stand was, "people who live in Camp should be represented by someone who also lives in Camp and understands fully the trials and tribulations."

Mr Hansen said his feelings regarding the abattoir are already well documented through his work as Chairman of the Rural Business Association and says he will, ...continue to support it so long as it does not turn into silly money."

He added that in his election campaign he plans to address the state of the Mount Pleasant Road, the repair and maintenance of existing roads and the Government wage bill.

Eric Goss also confirmed this week he would offer himself for election to represent Camp in the forthcoming by-election

Mr Goss has represented Camp twice in the past; he won a by-election in 1986 and was re-elected in 1993, serving four years.

Mr Goss describes himself as, "...a Camper through and through," with experience in, "...big farm management for 28 years plus two years navy/shepherd experience at North Arm and trainee farm manager at Pebble Island in 1962 - 1966, giving me 36/37 years experience in Camp life and its problems."

Mr Goss added, "I think I have a

Mr Goss added, "I think I have a good ground base to represent the people who can vote in the by-election and invite voters in Camp to encourage me to keep on track for election."

#### Not standing

Two former councillors confirmed yesterday they would not be standing in the by-election.

Sharon Halford, who has represented Stanley on past councils said, "I will not be standing for election in the by-election despite speculation."

She added, "I could not bring my-

self to work with seven people who could allow a husband and wife to be elected to a three party Executive Council (ExCo).

"I have no problem if the electorate wish to have two members of one family on council but to have them both on ExCo, in my opinion, was not democratic."

Richard Stevens of Port Sussex Farm also confirmed he would not be standing.

The former Camp representative said he had, "...thought about it long and hard," but eventually decided not to stand.

He explained he plans to negotiate a land lease with the government over the next few years and this. "...would create a very difficult situation."

Robin Goodwin, an unsuccessful candidate in the election held in 2001 has also confirmed he will not be standing in the by-election.

# FI tour operators' insurance worry

THE Chief Execituve, Chris Simpkins, has met with senior government officials and representatives of the tourist industry in an attempt to find a solution to the lack of insurance available to tourism businesses in the Falkland Islands.

For more than a year tour operators have faced problems in obtaining insurance, but Mr Simpkins said the government, in conjunction with Faikland Islands Tourism, is working to find a solution.

He explained, "The problem arises primarily, but not solely, because of the nervousness of insurers about the size of claims and awards being made by courts in the United States.

"It does not relate to any particular issue in the Falklands but is world-wide.

"We obviously hope that we can find a solution quickly but I cannot speculate on the outcome."

He yesterday confirmed. "Tour operators are continuing discussions with possible insurers and I have made contact with Caribbean Alliance Insurance who have experience of these problems elsewhere and are examining whether they can provide

cover.
"We are also looking at whether FIG's own policy can be extended."

#### New passports available

THE British Embassy in Santiago can now issue British machine-readable passports to people travelling from the Falkland Islands via Chile.

The United States Government announced in July that travellers with non machine-readable passports must obtain a US Non-immigrant Visa prior to arrival or change to a machine-readable passport whilst abroad. The Falklands Islands Immigration Department is, at present, unable to issue such passports.

However, progress on the problem has been made. A spokesperson for the Immigration Department yesterday said the small team of consular staff at the Brittish Embassy in Santiago. "...have just completed training in the use of their recently installed machine-readable passport equipment and are now accepting applications.

"It can take up to two weeks to process an application and issue a passport. However, a special arrangement is now in place to limit the delay to individuals travelling from the Falklands."

# Shippers to Marchwood face higher costs

SHIPPERS of Falklands wool to Marchwood in the United Kindgom could face significantly higher costs in the future, the government has confirmed.

Towards the end of last summer, notification was received that wool from the Falkland Islands could no longer be cleared into the UK through the military port facilities at Marchwood – a route which had been in use for many years – because Marchwood is not licensed as a Border Inspection Post.

This meant wool being shipped by Bax Global on charter to the Ministry of Defence had to be transhipped by barge to Southampton, incurring additional costs. This additional expense was met by the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) for the last two shipments of the season.

A spokesperson for the government said, since being notified of the change, FIG has been lobbying, "...to secure a reversal of the decision but a change in legislation has led the Department for the Environment and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) to become far more vigilant in the enforcement of regulations controlling the importation of all animal material and is clear that no exception will be made in respect of Marchwood.

"Shipments can continue to be made via Marchwood but FIG has no

plans to pay transhipment costs to Southampton in the future.

"Shippers are therefore recommended to investigate the available alternatives."

Councillor Mike Summers, the portfolio holder for agriculture, expressed his disappointment: "Despite the fact that our record in terms of disease free status is second to none, it is plain that we have reached the end of the road in terms of trying to secure a relaxation through Marchwood to benefit the Falkland Islands."

Shipments using the service provided by FIC Ltd into Shoreham are unaffected as the port is a licenced Border Inspection Post.

I WAS interested to read the letter from John Allan (page7) about the construction of Ross Road and the introduction of vehicles to the Falklands in the 1940s.

He mentions a photograph we were unable to print which shows a crowd of fifty or so people standing outside Jubilee Villas in 1942 on a Ross Road which he describes as a 'stone run'. One can clearly see what is, in essence, a potholed track.

Sadly, such a description is not unfamiliar to modern readers and the photo of Ross Road built by the Germans almost fifty years ago (also page 7) can only serve to make us feel ashamed today.

The harbour road which is so often used as a focal point for publicity shots of the Islands has fallen into a state of disrepair but, apart from the odd piece of tarmac patching, nothing seems to be happening about the problem.

How is it that, with limited and simple technology in the 1940s, they were able to build a quality road which stood the test of time, war and prosperity and yet we, with a hell of a lot more money and resources within our reach, are unable to even begin to produce a road to an equal standard?

I can't help wondering if we have our priorities upside down.

It was announced last month that a new car park for Gilbert House was going to cost a whopping £92,000.

Granted, this figure was recognised as excessive and PWD were told to come back with a more realistic figure.

This realistic figure will be, at a guess, over £40,000 - still a substantial sum - so why not put off the car park and use the funds for this and other inessential works which only benefit a few by pouring it towards renewing Ross Road?

A new car park is not an urgent requirement and right now the front road, which is the gateway to the Islands for so many of our (paying) visitors, is an embarrassment.

Please FIG, bite the bullet and rebuild this important entrance to our capital.

# Malvina House Hotel sale: FIG stake 'immaterial'



COUNCILLOR SUMMERS feels the fact the Malvina House Hotel (above) is to be purchased by Stanley Services Ltd, a business in which the government has a stake. is, "largely immaterial." given future developments proposed to the share structure of the company.

It was announced late last week that Stanley Services Ltd is acquiring Malvina House Hotel from its owners. Mike and Phyllis Rendell.

The Falkland Islands Government (FIG) owns approximately 65% of Stanley Services Ltd, with S & JD Robertson owning the balance.

This shareholding came about following the purchase of Hogg Robinson shares after it went in to receivership. FIG had previously owned 45%.

Chairman of Stanley Services Ltd, Councillor Mike Summers this week said. "...negotiations are well advanced for FIG and S & JD Robertson to bring in another partner to Stanley Services Ltd which, if successful, would result in the shareholding being approximately 45/35/25 FIG/S&JDR/new party."

He added, "In the negotiations with the other parties to create this new structure it has been agreed that FIG has the right to sell its remaining 45% to local residents, and Executive Council has agreed that this should be done.

"Further work will be required

on this second phase to define all the detail, but I would anticipate that the sale should take place during 2004."

Councillor Summers said, in light of these proposed developments, the fact the Malvina House Hotel is being purchased by a business in which FIG has a stake, "...seems to me largely immaterial."

He continued, "What is important is that the hotel is owned by someone who can consolidate and build on the excellent work done by the present owners to make Malvina House Hotel an important part of the tourism infrastructure, and who has both the commitment and the resources to continue to develop the business."

Councillor Summers added that the FIG directors on the Stanley Services board had, "...made it perfectly clear that FIG will not adopt a policy of directing its clients to Malvina House Hotel."

Stanley Services is expected to assume ownership of the hotel in early January 2004.

Announcing the purchase deal late last week. Tom Swales, Managing Director of Stanley Services Limited said, "...the acquisition will add strength to its existing Tourism/Travel Division and it demonstrates the confidence that the company has in the future of the Islands' economy and the tourist sector."

#### Islander returns for teacher training

A FALKLAND ISLANDER is undertaking graduate teacher training in the Islands this year.

Louise McLeod (22) is attached to the Community School (FICS) as part of a graduate training programme as she intends to train as an English teacher in a year's time.

FICS Headteacher Alan Purvis said Louise will, "...begin by acting in a learning support role in several subject areas and eventually focus more on the English curriculum as a support teacher."

Louise obtained a degree in English language and literature at St

Mary's University in Twickenham.

Mr Purvis added, "We hope that this experience will be of great value to her when she begins her teacher training."

Louise completed her senior education at the Community School and says it feels strange to be back in her new role. She said. "Every time the bell goes, I keep thinking I should head to my locker."

Louise intends to return to the Falklands to teach in the future. She said. "After a few years' experience in other countries, I'd like to come back."

#### Alcohol leads to two men to court

TWO men appeared in court on Wednesday charged with alcohol related offences.

Terence Kenneth Mills (58) of Stanley was charged with procuring and consuming intoxicating liquor whilst subject of a prohibition order (the Black List)

Senior Crown Counsel, Graham Cripps told the court that on August 13 Mr Mills entered a Stanley store and purchased alcohol.

Mills was seen by the police and during an interview admitted buying and drinking the alcohol, claiming that he was confused by dates and thought it was August he was due to finish his prohibition order.

After a short deliberation Justice of the Peace John Fowler told Mills breeching a prohibition order was a 'serious matter'

He added that as there was some doubt as to whether Mills had ever received a copy of the prohibition order the panel had decided to accept he genuinely made a mistake.

Mr Mills was ordered to pay £35 prosecution costs and issued with a six month conditional discharge. The prohibition order was not reinstated.

Drink driving Alejandro Neri Igao was disqualified from driving for one year, had his licence endorsed and was charged £70 costs after he drove while drunk.

On August 30, acting on information received that Mr Igao had been drinking and was driving, police officers were despatched to locate Mr Igao's vehicle and found it outside a house on Ross Road West.

Following a positive roadside breath test. Mr Igao was arrested and taken to Stanley Police Station.

A Camic breath test provided a

lower reading of 69 mls per 100 ml. almost twice the legal limit.

"Persons in the Falklands intending to renew their passport in Santiago will still need to be available for a few days in Santiago, but it is not expected to be as much as a week (so long as you have provided all information and documents required with your application.)'

In the meantime, talks continue with the FCO concerning purchase and installation of machine-readable passport equipment in the Falklands. A paper will be submitted to Executive Council for consideration at the October meeting and if accepted equipment could be installed early in

Applications can be lodged with the British Embassy in Santiago on weekday mornings (09:30 - 12:30).

The Immigration spokesperson said, "It is envisaged that applicants from the Falklands who present a

complete application on a Monday morning, should be able to collect their new passport on Tuesday or Wednesday (This time frame cannot be absolutely guaranteed however, as passport production depends on a number of factors such as availability of staff and reliability of machinery. The Embassy will inform the Customs and Immigration Department immediately if there is likely be a delay in issuing a pass-

port)"
The cost of a machine-readable passport in Santiago is currently CP\$67,800 for a 32-page book or CP\$81,240 for a 48-page book. The Embassy is only able to accept payment in Chilean Pesos cash.



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#### Health and Medical Services meeting

#### KEMH plans for loss of dental tech

THE Medical Committee has been exploring options to replace the hospital's dental technician.

The person who currently fills the role will resign later this month and the Director of Health said he needed to seek advice on how dental prosthetics should now be provided.

Mr McGregor Edwards explained that "The current service costs FIG £19,000 plus £3,800 per annum for supplies. This makes a total cost, for the service, of approximately

There are additional costs associated with specialist prosthetics which cannot be manufactured here. but these will not be affected by any changes to local services.

He explained that the committee had four options open to them:
• Replace 'like for like' with a

- local-contract technician
- Contract out the service locally. as piecework
- · Replace 'like for like' with a contract officer
- · Have prosthetics made by dental laboratories overseas. He explained, "Whilst we believe

that there are currently no local persons able to provide a technician or piecework service, we will advertise locally just in case.

"We have contacted an Islander who previously provided technician services and now lives overseas. He would like to return to the Islands at some point in the future and would be interested in piecework, but his return is unlikely in the short/medium term

Mr McGregor Edwards added that replacing the technician with a contract officer would be expensive: "Including salary, flights, gratuity and housing costs, it is likely to be of the order of £35,000 to £40,000 depending on individual circumstances

At present, making prosthetics locally costs £22,800. Mr McGregor Edwards said, "...the equivalent cost of sending items to a laboratory in the UK is estimated at about £16.000 including airfreight costs.

"It might be possible to reduce this cost by using laboratories in

Chile and this is being investigated."
He continued. "If we cannot provide a technician locally, then having prosthetics made overseas is undoubtedly the most cost-effective solution.

There is, however, a time-penalty. Currently, the presence of an on-site technician means a very rapid turn-round of repairs and manufactures although this is affected by the routine waiting times to see a dentist for fittings.

Sending items overseas will involve a waiting time of perhaps 2-3 weeks and this may prove unpopu-

"Basic repairs can still be undertaken locally.

The Medical Committee agreed to wait for further information before agreeing the way forward.

#### **Fisheries Committee**

#### Port report: 'keep and extend FIPASS'

A DRAFT report into the case for development of port facilities in the Falklands was considered by the Fisheries Committee at its meeting on Wednesday.

The report commissioned by the Falkland Islands Government was produced by Jonathan Packer and Associates, a management consultancy providing advisory services in all aspects of management and business development for the ship-owning, port and transport industries

In its conclusions, the report recommends FIG:

· Use FIPASS and keep East Cove. Ensure that FIPASS access and draft can be improved.

Do not over-extend by undertaking large, up-front capital investment

Test the market, "Build a cold store first (in a co-operative venture) and have the capability to double its size later. Develop direct fish sales progressively from this base.

Encourage Maersk, (international shippers) but establish fall back plans.

Keep the focus very clear. "Seek the potential additional added value from the fish as the priority from the start."

Other fishing support activities can follow, "...but avoid major involvement in the blind alley of developing ship repair facilities.'

Avoid jeopardising relationships with foreign partners and li-cence fee income. "On the other hand it would be safer in the long term to develop the home fishery than depend on the vagaries of the world fisheries market and foreign fishing interests."

The draft report will be presented to Executive Council.

#### Harbour risk assessment

FOLLOWING a number of collisions in the past year between ships and FIPASS, the Fisheries Advisory Committee has requested a full risk assessment.

The assessment will be produced by the Fisheries harbour department.

According to the Chairman of the committee, Councillor Richard Cockwell, fendering on FIPASS will also be examined as a matter of urgency.

#### Patients overseas - remember insurance

PATIENTS travelling overseas for medical treatment must obtain their own insurance, however the government is looking at options to help individuals whose cases are urgent.

The Falkland Islands Government's (FIG) business travel insurance policy does not provide cover for patients who are sent overseas for medical treatment and patients are therefore strongly advised to take out their own personal travel insur-

However in urgent cases where the patient has no time to obtain insurance, the government is looking at options for providing cover.
Director of Health Norman

McGregor Edwards explained that this personal insurance will not cover the patient. "...for the condition for which they are being sent overseas. but will cover them for accidents and unrelated conditions as well as their baggage. flight delays and other risks.

Whilst many do take out travel insurance, there is evidence that some still decide not to insure themselves as they believe that FIG insures medical treatment overseas

#### Falklands to host Red Ensign Conference

THE 2005 Red Ensign Group Conference may be held in the Falkland Islands

Each year delegates from the Overseas Territories and Crown Dependencies which have shipping registers meet with senior staff members of the UK Maritime and Coastguard Agency (MCA) to dis-cuss matters of, "...mutual interest such as marine safety and current and future shipping legislation."

In a paper to the Fisheries Committee, Marine Officer Jon Clark said, "The conference is hosted by a different Overseas Territory or Crown Dependency each year. though next year the conference is to be held at a venue in the UK close to the MCA headquarters in Southampton.

The conference is usually held over three days (Tuesday to Thursday) in late May or early June. Obviously, if the Falkland Islands were to host the conference, it would be preferable to bring it forward to late February or early March."

Mr Clark said holding the con-

ference in the Islands would provide opportunities for councillors. government officials and members of the shipping and fishing indus-tries to meet the hierarchy of the MCA.

He added, "The MCA also proposes to combine the conference with a monitoring visit as a followup to the previous marine safety surveys carried out by Mr Claude Hamilton and Ms Gwen Evans of the MCA

Likely costs for the provision of catering, transport and excursions during the Conference will be £7,000-8.000

#### Budget restoration: medical funds may receive boost

Some suggestions for restored services were to fill the post of Occupational Therapist and reintroduce free viagra and nicotine replacement therapy.


#### Midwinter swim total announced

#### Mutton chosen to reflect price moves for index

I WRITE in response to Eric Goss's letter of August 6, which was received at the office on August 18.

Councillors discussed this at the August GPC and have since received additional information from the Treasury and FIDC which is provided below.

Mutton mince was a commodity that was selected to reflect movements in local meat prices when the current Retail Price Index (RPI) was compiled in 1999.

In 1999 the average price of mutton mince was recorded at £1.81 per kilo. The current price is now £2.00 per kilo. This shows an increase of 19p or 10% over 4 years which is marginally higher than the increase in the overall RPI over the same period of 8%.

The total weight applied to the RPI is 1000 out of which 266 is weighted for food. Out of the 266 weight for food, 55 is weighted for meat, poultry and fish. From this weight of 55, mutton mince attracts a weight of 19. The effect of a 10% increase in the price of mutton mince on the RPI is therefore a rise of 0.19% (10% x 19/1000).

With regard to the amount paid to the farmer, it is believed that in fact only a small number of farmers are in a position to sell their sheep for £12 per head.

A key objective of the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo)has to be to increase the payment made to farmers from the current figure of £5.00 per head and this is to be looked at for the coming season.

Another important objective for FIMCo will be to improve the consistency of beef production, which is currently highly variable, and it is envisaged that farmers who produce a better quality product should be rewarded accordingly.

#### Surviving road needs care



RECENTLY I received a letter from my 96 year old cousin living in Guildford, thanking me for the photograph I had sent her looking across Stanley harbour from our lounge window in Jubilee Villas.

She commented that she remembered when the oil tanks and structures were built at the Camber and, in 1952, riding in the back of the first motor vehicle to be imported into the Falklands

She went on to describe how both children and adults were charged a fare of sixpence (2.5 pence in today's currency) for the privilege of a return ride from Jubilee Villas to Government House sitting in the back of this Ford Model lorry.

I have since sent her a copy of a photograph of that vehicle (below) to see whether she can identify any of the novelty joy riders portrayed.

I personally can only identify two with any certainty, Len Reives a passenger and Jack Barnes driv-

It was Mr Barnes and his brother who imported the vehicle; perhaps some readers may be able to identify others?

That photograph of the lorry prompted me to select four photographs all taken at the same place on Ross Road to portray the road surface, beginning with the introduction of motor vehicles in 1952 through the years to that of the present day.

The second photo taken in 1932 is of the mechanical road roller imported in late 1929. This was an Aveling Barford coal fired steam roller and at that time Ross Road was being restructured using curb stones and the formation of sidewalks plus the road surface for the first time ever was being tarmaced using cold tar.

People pictured in the photo are Gordon Roberts (son of Director of PWD Mr S 1 Roberts), Fred Allan (my father), George Kelway, Harry (Tom) Duffin, (Maude Sollis' father), and Peter Hills (Richard Hill's father).

The third photograph was taken in 1954 and shows a road surface not unlike that of a stone run which was common to all the streets in Stanley at that time.
The arrival of the army Garri-

son in 1942 brought a large influx of motor vehicles, in particular steel tracked bren gun carriers which decimated all road surfaces through out Stanley

Among the gathering of people witnessing the arrival of a new Governor (Arrowsmith) is Joyce with our eldest son David in the pram, Joyce's mother Rose McCarthy and grandfather Mike McCarthy. Both of our families in the Falklands go back to 1842.

The fourth photo (above) shows Ross Road in 1957 with a ceremonial parade to welcome Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh. All of Ross Road had recently been resurfaced with reinforced concrete and today, 46 years later and surviving a bloody war, we are still driving on that same surface!

A fitting tribute maybe to the German construction gang that laid it but after nearly half a century surely the time is long overdue for some tender loving care?

#### 1980s teachers depicted unfairly

I NOTED with interest your editorial in the Penguin News dated Friday, August 22, regarding the school reunion for children taught in the 1980's in the Stanley Schools.

I accept that reunions are a time for reminiscing and our memories as children are often of the worst characteristics of those who taught us. On these occasions, those characteristics or remembered incidents are often blown up in order to get a good laugh.

However, I doubt that too many of those present really desired that those memories, which were aired for a good laugh, should then be translated into a stinging and insulting attack in your editorial on those same teachers.

The two teachers pictured were Ian Jones and Ian Townsend, I'm not sure if I was headmaster at the time or John Peatfield.

John and Ann Peatfield were excellent teachers and no one could have cared more about the children in his class than Ian Jones. In fact, all the teachers in our school were competent and caring.

It was a very difficult time in the early 80's. We were all traumatised ourselves but nevertheless the schools had to be cleaned up and made fit for human habitation (which was no mean feat).

It also meant we had to deal

with children whose world had been turned upside down. The only pictures they would draw were of war and battles. We had to be extra sensitive to their needs and yet get them motivated again.

I don't think we were back into a normal routine until 1983-84. Everyone worked really hard to get the children settled.

I remember Ann Peatfield doing a play with the children that was the best play I have ever been involved with, a credit to her and all the children.

The teachers I knew do not fit your description at all. Yes, there were some characters, there always are, and I guess one or two were not perfect - you can include me in that - but we really cared about the children and their welfare.

Perhaps I could venture to say that it was the groundwork laid then, in difficult circumstances, that has enabled the children of that time to grow up into useful citizens: lawyers, teachers, marine biologists, nurses and the like.

I've been moved to write this, not on my own behalf, but because I feel your editorial was an unfair reflection on the ability and character of the teachers of that time.

It was good to see those photographs again. Thank you. Derek Evans Staffordshire

# Hope Cottage hosts agricultural field day

A FIELD day held at Hope Cottage last week attracted thirty-seven peo-ple and featured discussion of a wide range of topics.

The day was organised by the De-partment of Agriculture, with pres-entations by Wool Adviser Neil Judd. Agronomist Andrew Pollard, Nutritionist Niilo Gobius and Chief Veterinary Officer Stephen Pointing.

Support was also provided by Malcolm Ashworth. Phillip Miller. Stuart Doyle and Doug Martin, with guest speaker Gustavo Stanton-Yonge, a practising vet from Chile. who has strong connections with the Falkland Islands.

Owners of Hope Cottage. Terrence and Carol Phillips hosted the event.

Doug Martin said Terrence began proceedings by outlining the crop and re-seed programme started by

Hope Cottage five years ago.
"Due to success with brassicas last season 35 hectares were sown, this being carried out in November. 92 head of cattle are being grazed on an area of 30 ha of Dominion Swede. Civasto, Rondo and Barkant Turnip. Keeper Kale and Pasja Forage Rape.

A further 5 hectares of Appin Turnip and Dominion Swede is also being grazed by 450 ewes and 100 hoggets.

Grazing of the cattle commenced in June, and sheep in July. 3 hectares of Nehuen Oats was also planted and grazed by sheep in May."
In the morning session Neil Judd

looked at the possibility of increasing lambing percentages and target weights by providing better nutrition with crops at strategic times of the



Niilo Gobius detailed the importance of costs and returns, while giving an insight into one of his research programmes by demonstrating, using a a spreadsheet model, the critical times of the year when nutritional deficiencies occur, and how by optimising stocking rates the impact will not be as great

Phillip Miller outlined his role with the management of the Machinery Pool and Malcolm Ashworth looked at fodder conservation, in particular round bale silage. Vet Steve Pointing detailed some of the issues that may arise with the grazing of crops, particularly Brassicas.

Mr Martin said a paddock inspection carried out by the group,

proved interesting, from the viewpoint of grazing management and crop utilisation with the use of hotwires, and discussion took place regarding seedbed preparation and sowing rates and methods

The performance of the different varieties was noted, and even though dry matter yields were taken, the true indication of animal intake can only be gauged by objective measurements such as weight gain, weaning percentages and most im-portantly by survival, particularly of breeding stock." He continued, "The cattle are moved daily, consuming approximately one hectare per week, with an intake of 4.2 to 4.5 tonnes of dry matter in this period

This is assuming an intake of 70% as cattle and sheep need access to camp in order to receive a more balanced ration.

"In relation to the cattle, the 30 hectares of Brassica crop would conservatively carry 215 steer weaners at 200 kg or 135 steers weighing 350 kg for 4 to 5 months. Cost per tonne of dry matter has been calculated to be £40 - £45, however it is important to remember that this winter has been exceptionally mild, therefore the tops as well as the bulbs are still available to the cattle and

During the afternoon Phillip Miller gave a demonstration on ditching with his backhoe, proven to improve survival of livestock

The day was rounded off with a talk by Andrew Pollard on varieties of Oats and Brassicas crops and planting times, according to the type of Brassica selected.

Mr Martin said discussion was also held about cover crops for reseeds, site selection, soil fertility and pH and sowing methods

'Stuart Doyle provided some information on Triticale, a cross between Wheat and Cereal Rye, which should be well suited to the conditions in the Falkland Islands

Finally Gustavo Stanton-Yonge gave the group, "...an insight into the sheep industry in Region XII in Chile, with an emphasis on the changes that have taken place with the development of the sheepmeat industry there.

Mr Martin said the staff of the Department of Agriculture wished to. sincerely thank Terrence and Carol for their hospitality and providing an excellent venue

### Naval commander: 'the Falklands are part of my psyche'

By Sharon Marsh A NAVAL officer who served in the Falklands War aboard HMS Coventry as a young man is back in the Islands, this time in charge of a Type 23 Frigate.

Commanding Officer Paul Chivers (pictured right) has served on a number of ships in addition to the Coventry and is now aboard HMS Lancaster

He explained that during the Falklands conflict, he served as an officer under training on Coventry: "Having joined the Royal Navy in 1981, she was my first ship and I was only a young man. The experience has certainly shaped my life. consequently Coventry and the Falkland Islands will always be part of my psyche

It is therefore a privilege and a very poignant event to return to the Islands as the Commanding Officer of my own warship

I will be taking this rare opportunity to hold a personal memorial service in the area in which Coventry now lies.

IIMS Lancaster's Falklands connections date back to 1916 when on Christmas Eve, whilst serving on Pacific Station, she visited Stanley

Two of her 6"guns were landed and rebuilt as gun emplacements on Sappers Hill. These guns were later manhandled to their present





location on Canopus Hill.

A 'Duke' Class Type 23 Frigate, HMS Lancaster was built on the Clyde by Yarrow Shipbuilders. The sixth vessel named HMS Lancaster, she was launched on May 24. 1990 by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

#### Crew

HMS Lancaster has a displacement of approximately 4000 tonnes and a ship's company of 189 - 185 male. 3 female and 'Sunny' the par-

Lieutenant Commander John Pheasant, the Logistics and Supply Officer explained that Sunny was donated to HMS Lancaster by The Sun newspaper.

Sunny's predecessor, Jenny, met a tragic end when a crew member believing, as her wings had been clipped. Jenny was unable to fly, took her on deck for a stroll

Jenny then demonstrated that she was in fact able to fly but clearly not quite as well as she may have hoped and plunged into the

Despite the distraught crew member diving into the sea to save her, she drowned. The Sun on hearing of Jenny's demise, donated Sunny who joined the ship as an Ordinary Seaman

In July, just prior to HMS Lancaster's deployment, The Sun were on board to witness Sunny's promotion to Leading Hand as a result of her unblemished service.

#### Merlin helicopter

HMS Lancaster boasts a Merlin HM Mk I helicopter and the





aircraft's crew took advantage of its Stanley visit with an extended flight over the town on Sunday af-

The Merlin is relatively new to the Royal Navy but is an impressive aircrast equipped with a state of the art integrated mission system which processes data from an extensive array of on board sensors. This equipment gives the Merlin, "...an independent capability to search, locate and attack submarine targets.

It is this autonomous capability which makes the Merlin unique among anti-submarine helicopters.

HMS Lancaster is to remain in the Falkland Islands until Novem-

# General Practice with dentist, David Fyre

#### Dental health and what to believe

IT IS the role of the dentist and the dental hygienist to educate patients about their oral health.

Educating is not always straightforward because people already have ingrained beliefs about their teeth

The aim of this article is to expose some of the most popular beliefs about teeth and gums and illustrate whether they are true or false and what are their complications.

1) All the calcium came out of my teeth when I was pregnant.

False. If the mother has sufficient calcium in her diet, there is not a problem. Calcium will not come out of the teeth to supply the needs of the embryo or foetus even if the mother is malnourished.

The most likely tooth problems around pregnancy are gum disease and tooth decay which may be the origin of this belief about calcium.

Swollen and bleeding gums are affected by hormonal changes around pregnancy and tooth decay may be more likely as swollen gums harbour food debris and bacteria and eating habits may change You may blame your toothache on pregnancy, but don't blame your baby.

2) My children need a lot of dental work because they had soft teeth

to begin with. False.

All teeth are hard. Tooth enamel is one of the hardest natural substances there is - harder than iron. gold, or porcelain. Some teeth are more susceptible to decay than others, but it is never because the teeth are soft

It is because they mineralized imperfectly (an uncommon cause) or were not cared for after they came into the mouth (a more common

3) When a child's gums bleed

leave them alone. They will heal by

False. Most often it is the food and bacteria that will collect at the spot where the gums and teeth meet that are causing the trouble.

Brush more effectively. In two or three days, the gums will usually toughen up and won't bleed so readily. They will continue to stay well unless you fail to brush them properly.

4) It's normal for gums to bleed a bit from time to time.

False, healthy gums should not bleed As in 3) proper brushing and cleaning between the teeth with floss or special small brushes will encourage healthy gums.

5) My tooth just broke, it's the dentists fault.

Broken tooth is a complaint the dentist is confronted with many times a day. Healthy teeth do not just break unless they receive a hefty impact.

The usual cause of the broken tooth is tooth decay. Decay starts with an acid attack on the outer enamel then spreads into the softer layer of dentine.

Very often the individual is unaware a cavity has formed beneath the surface over several months if not years. It is at a late stage that the outer enamel layer finally breaks.

The "broken tooth" may also be due to the presence of a large filling. The decay process can continue under a filling which can cause the filling to break or fall out. Filled teeth are also weaker because the filling does not hold the tooth structure together; hence it is very common for a fragment or the side of a tooth to break off suddenly.

The dentist aims to repair teeth

that are already diseased and prevent further damage. It's not the dentists fault that teeth break!

6) I only need to go to the dentist

when it hurts.
False. It's important to keep up regular checks so the dentist can detect any problems early and so sup-

ply any necessary preventative advice or remedial treatment.

7) If I have dentures all my troubles will be over and I won't have to go to the dentist again.

False. If you have a false eye you don't expect to see with it, if you have a false leg you don't expect to run with it. Unfortunately many people expect false teeth to perform just as a set of healthy natural teeth would

In fact, having all the teeth removed and dentures fitted actually brings on a whole new set of responsibilities and problems.

Dentures require constant cleaning just as natural teeth and gums do.

Dentures should not mean the end of dental appointments; the patient should keep up annual visits with the dentist to be checked for any health problems.

It is important not to neglect these visits so as to catch any problems early and this could even save your life as it is often the dentist who will pick up signs of medical problems.

These are just a few of the beliefs that the dentist comes across during practically every working day. Is it better to stick to the old beliefs or listen to a professional?

The well proven advice still holds to brush well twice a day with a fluoride toothpaste, cut down on sugary snacks and drinks (especially fizzy drinks) and visit the dentist every six months.

# Wool market report for week ending September 5

by Neil Judd, Wool Advisor, Department of Agriculture

General Overview

Greasy wool prices fell marginally in Australia for fleece lots finer than 25 micron, but remained firm for broader micron fleece wool lots.

New Zealand was reported as generally stronger, with the fine wool indicator up 5 NZ cents per kilogram clean and the Medium indicator up 13 NZ cents.

South African wool prices slipped by around 3% as a result of a strengthening of their currency relative to other major currencies.

It is of interest to compare wool prices being achieved by Falkland Islands farmers to those received by farmers in Uruguay, South America

Joaquin B Allolio (Weekly South American Wool Market Report) stated in his most recent report that Corriedale fleece wool (27.5 micron, 74% yield) was trading at approximately US \$2.73 greasy "farm gate" basis and 28.5 micron fleece wool at approximately US \$2.57, again greasy "farm gate" basis.

Conversion of these prices into pence per kilogram clean values gives an estimated "farm gate" price of £2.35 per kilogram clean for the 27.5 micron fleece wool and £2.15 for the 28.5 micron fleece wool. Such "farm gate" prices are lower than the "Gross" clean wool prices

being achieved by Falkland Island farmers, but are comparable to most "Net Stanley" prices being achieved by Falkland Island farmers.

The current comparable "farm gate" prices being achieved in Uruguay (at least for broader fleece wool) clearly highlights the impact of freight and marketing costs to overall returns for Falkland Islands woolgrowers.

British Quotations for Tops British top quotations reflected the greasy wool markets of the world, with quotations rising for all micron categories.

Australian Market

In total 48,402 bales of wool were offered for sale during the week, with 42,073 bales purchased by the trade. Pass in rate averaged 13.0%.

Included in the offering were 3,410 bales of crossbred wool, of which 2,802 bales were sold. (pass in rate 17.8%).

Auctions next week

56,000 bales are rostered for sale in Australia, 6.000 bales in Bradford and a sale in New Zealand.

#### FIC oil partner exploring in West Africa

AN Australian consortium with interests in the Falkland Islands has started exploration drilling at the Chinguetti oilfield off the coast of Mauritania, West Africa.

According to a release from Perth based Hardman Resources the drilling is expected to confirm the presence of 95 million barrels. "a significant find for a small explorer", in a relatively small field by international standards. Chinquetti 4-5 is the first of four wells to be drilled this year.

Hardman Resources Limited together with Global Petroleum Ltd. (operator) and the Falkland Islands Company also have an offshore exploration initial three year permit covering ten licence blocks with a total area of approximately 57.000 sq. kilometres in the South Falklands Basin, granted under an "open-door" policy introduced by the Falklands' government in 2001. Hardman Resources Limited

that is listed in the Australian Stock Exchange and on the Alternative Investment Market of the London Stock Exchange is also scheduled to begin oil exploration in Lake Albert, Uganda late this month.

Apparently Hardman was first licenced to explore for oil in Uganda in 1997 but pulled out three years later because of a drop in world oil prices, returning in 2001 when oil prices stabilized.

In the mid nineties Hardman Resources embarked upon an international strategy of acquiring acre-

age in under explored but prospective regions. Besides the Mauritania-Chinguetti operation Hardman has assembled a portfolio of international projects at various stages of development that include offshore French Guiana, offshore Gabon, the Albertine Graben in Uganda, the Great South Basin offshore New Zealand and the Southem Falklands basin.

Hardman's management strategy in the medium term has been summarized as follows

1)to develop the Group's significant position in the offshore Mauritania project areas as the scope of work intensifies and the possibilities for early production are actively investigated;

2)to continue to add value to the company's other project areas through focussed technical work and carefully structured joint venture arrangements, and

3)to maximize returns to the company's producing asset, the Woodada Gas Field, Western Australia, by prudent management and an innovative exploration and development program.

In July 2002 Hardman Resources Managing Director Ted Ellyard said the timetable for the Southern Falklands basin would include a first year of reprocessing exiting seismic data; in year two shooting for new seismic data and "if the results are encouraging drilling could occur in 3 to 4 years.

#### Argentina-IMF talks continue

THE Argentine government officially decided this Tuesday to suspend repayment of an IMF 2.9 billion US dollars credit that was due today. Argentina had anticipated that if an agreement, currently being discussed with the IMF was not reached by September 9 it would take this drastic action which means the country defaulted

However Casa Rosada sources stressed that "we are willing to honour the commitment and we will continue negotiations", further un-derlining that the "technical" default only, "...becomes a real fullfledged in thirty days time.

Economy Minister Roberto Lavagna, who was scheduled to fly to Mexico for the Cancun World Trade Organization talks, cancelled the trip and will remain in Buenos Aires to continue negotiations.

Discussions for a three year program with the IMF face three main stumbling points: primary budget surplus. public utility rates and bank compensations

IMF insists in a primary surplus equivalent to 4.5% of GDP, sufficient to ensure repayment of the December 2001 defaulted sovereign bond debt: Argentina argues that 3% is enough since the country needs to grow to be able to pay.

Regarding utility rates and bank compensations, the President Kirchner administration rejects what it describes as private foreign corporations "IMF lobbying," insisting that one out of two Argentines is poor and, "...they also have to be compensated.'

Besides President Kirchner has repeatedly accused IMF officials of economic and financial "ill advice" that helped Argentina collapse into the current situation.

Actually Mr. Kirchner in the coming days and weeks faces crucial provincial and legislative elections and flatly rejects talking about utility rate hikes or compensation to banks.

"We will not sign agreements we can't honour or that could thwart the incipient recovery of the economy," said Argentine cabinet chief Alberto Fernandez.

The Argentine and Chilean press reported that Chilean president Ricardo Lagos phoned president Kirchner to express his solidarity in his dispute with the IMF.

On Monday the US Under-Secretary for Latinamerican Affairs Roger Noriega suggested the IMF should be more flexible with Ar-

Most public utility companies and banks demanding compensations for the 2001 devaluation of the Argentine currency are Euro-

#### Chilean Fishing Industry targets Hoki

THE Chilean fisheries industry is improving the added value component of its products, as shown by the 20% increase in export revenue despite a 15% drop in catch volume in the Centre-South region. represented by the Fishing Industrialists Association (Asipes).

The sector generates almost 12% of the country's exports and provides 13,000 direct jobs. But its strategy now is to focus more on manufacturing end products with a higher added value instead of continuing to process only raw material or intermediate products.

This qualitative leap is aimed at improving the sector's international standing, boosting revenue and generating more employment

USD 20 million has been invested in this strategy over the last two and a half years. The latest project being the frozen hake plant that was inaugurated in Talcahuano, at a cost of 5 million US dollars.

The introduction of legislation setting maximum catches has also influenced this process. During the

1990s some fishery resources were almost exhausted, but harvesting is now more carefully managed through the annual catch quota sys-

One of the sector's main challenges now is turning hoki - or Patagonian grenadier - used for manufacturing fishmeal during the last three years, and into human consumption products to meet increasing demand from European and American markets, says recently appointed Asipes president

Rodrigo Sarquis.
Almost 35% of the 125,000 tonnes regional quota is destined for export, and the aim is for the whole volume to reach foreign mar-

kets within 5 years

"Having signed trade agreements with the European Union and the United States, which buy between 16 and 27% of Chile's fisheries and aquaculture products, we have high hopes of achieving this objective," said Mr. Sarquis. (FIS/

Responding to questions from members of the public and following news of recent mine finds in the Yorke Bay area, WO2 Taylor said, "The maintenance of all minefield fences and the provision of minefield notices and warning signs are the responsibility of FIG any questions raised regarding such business should be directed to FIG"

However he confirmed. "Unexploded mines have been washed up fairly recently on Yorke Bay Beach, this has happened on several occasions this year.

"This beach is adjacent to a minefield that backs on to the beach and comes into regular contact with the sea.

"My advice to any individual contemplating entry to this area is, if you cherish your feet, keep out as this is a suspect area - as the sign says. Avoid entry into this area at all times - it is potentially dangerous."

## Meat overboard

MEAT scheduled to be dumped overboard by the *Dorada* on a trip to South Georgia was a test batch, confirmed Development Corporation Manager Julian Morris

The meat was produced in the commissioning phase of the abattoir prior to European Union certification and was used to test the packaging.

"It is certainly not of export standard and may not all be fit for human consumption. It was offered to any interested parties - no expressions of interest were received."

The meat was scheduled to be disposed of in the most effective way - at sea outside the 12 mile parameter.

# Portillo to support Falklands at Argentine/British conference?

CONSERVATIVE back bencher Michael Portillo is likely to make a strong statement in support of the Falkland Islands when he attends the Argentine/British Conference (ABC) in Buenos Aires at the end of next month.

Mr Portillo is understood to have accepted an invitation to attend the eighth meeting of the non governmental organisation.

Falkland Islands councillors have attended the Conference when it has been held in Britain, but do not attend those held in Argentina.

This year the organisers, that include Chairman Martin O'Neill, Alastair Forsyth and Lord Montgomery are keen for some kind of representation from the Falkland Islands.

The conference discusses the Falkland Islands and other issues relating to Britain and Argentina.

The delegations comprise approximately twenty on each side, however, it is expected that the conference will be well attended by independent observers and Argentine press.

Another British Member of Parliament expected to attend is Derek Wyatt.

Baroness Hooper will also be

in attendance

Themes will include politics and economics, the Euro, Iraq. Cancun, the environment (fisheries and the Antarctic) the British and Argentine relationship and the Falkland Islands.

Spanish speaking Michael Portillo has always been a strong supporter of the rights of Falkland Islanders and it is anticipated that if he attends he will make it clear that Britain continues to support the wishes of Islanders.

In a recent report by the Secretary of the ABC, he noted the organisation believed Falkland Islanders should, "...begin a campaign to persuade Argentina to come to terms with the Britishness of the Islands, to accept the Islands as an offshore eccentricity, an historical anomaly, a sort of environmental conservation area, and as a friendly neighbour."

Or did they feel inadequately endowed in terms of stamina and intellect to face the curiosity and cross-examination of their peers?


Whatever the oddities of past candidates I feel it only right to state

## More mobile homes for Stanley?



#### Murray Heights mobile home park

MOBILE homes may not be the most attractive dwellings, but there is a need for them, some councillors and members of the public indicated at Tuesday's public meeting.

Following a presentation by the Environmental Planning Officer on the subject of the Falkland Islands Structure Plan and Stanley Town Plan. Mr Anthony Lancaster asked whether people felt there should be restrictions on the siting of further mobile homes, and a preference for purpose built small housing units.

It was noted that due to the lack of land available for release and purchase the mobile home was often a preferred option for people "...wishing to get on the housing ladder."

The suggestion that a second mobile home park could be built met with some favour at the meeting.

Low cost higher density housing was also mooted.

Councillor John Birmingham suggested, "...low cost homes in a terrace style would save money on services."

Councillor Mike Summers suggested that younger home buyers are less interested in large areas of land, thus there might be a high interest in small affordable units and higher density of housing.

He also noted that there was a demand for an increased rental pool.

Councillor Summers was unconvinced that another mobile home park would substantially reduce the waiting list for homes.



Members of the public recorded disapproval of the 'wavy' roads in the newly developed estate and asked why the traditional pattern had not been retained.

Two years on there was a desperation for housing plots and the Planning Officer Tony Lee suggested that for the sake of speed they should make use of the original Stanley Development Plan."

Environmental Planning Officer Anthony Lancaster commented, "...If the preference in the future is to revert back to a grid system then this can be looked at..."

## Court news

# Sex charge trial date

TROY John Bagley from Mount Pleasant had a trial date of September 29 set, with the trial expected to conclude within a period of two days. Mr Bagley faces a charge of unlawful sexual intercourse, under section 6 of the Sexual Offences Act 1956.

Affray

Coral McGill appeared in court to face a charge of affray, following what Police described as a 'cat fight' outside Coral McGill's home on Moody St.

Cara McGill as part of the same incident had a charge of affray reduced to that of. "...using threatening abusive behaviour or insulting words or disorderly behaviour within the hearing or sight of a person likely to be caused harassment, alarm or distress."

Both Cara and Coral McGill were given a conditional discharge for 18 months and ordered to pay costs of £70 each.

Speeding

A plea of guilty was received by post from Mr Owen Henry Lee in answer to a charge of speeding. Mr Lee was recorded travelling at a speed of 41 mph in a 25 mph zone along Ross Road East on September 7.

Mr Lee apologised to the court in his letter saying that it was out of character. Senior Magistrate Nick Sanders fined Lee £130 plus £70 costs and endorsed his licence.

Further charge

A trial date of September 26 was set for the case of Leroy John Young.

Young faced a further charge of failure without reasonable excuse to appear in court whilst remanded on bail, to which he entered a guilty plea.

Driving accident

Army driver Rachael Hobday was fined £300, had her licence endorsed and was ordered to pay £70 costs following a single vehicle road accident.

Miss Hobday was duty driver

on June 10, transporting a patient returning to MPA. While in the vicinity of Bluff Cove Miss Hobday lost control of the landrover and it veered off the road.

Senior Crown Counsel Graham Cripps, prosecuting, told the court that Hobday was on a gravel section of the road when the accident took place, the vehicle "...coming to rest on its roof at the side of the road, a total distance from the first mark on the road to final resting place, of 84 metres."

Mr Cripps added that there was substantial damage to the vehicle, and, "...the question of speed raises itself."

Private Hobday, due to return to UK next week, said in an interview that she had, "...suddenly lost control and left the road." adding she. "...couldn't remember if she put her foot on the brake or accelerator.

Driving offence

Local taxi driver Burnard Peck (67) also faced charges of:

 driving without due care and attention,

 driving without reasonable consideration for others using the road, and,

• failure to stop following an accident.

The charges were the result of a series of incidents which took place on August 3.

Mr Peck pleaded guilty to all three charges and received a fine of £75 and a licence endorsement for the first charge, £100 and an endorsement for the second, and £200 and an endorsement for the third.

He was also ordered to pay £70 costs and allowed 14 days to pay all fines and the court costs.

#### Reserve Constables

Five reserve constables with the Royal Falkland Island Police were sworn in on Wednesday morning in the Magistrates Court preceding several other cases brought before Senior Magistrate Nick Sanders.

Since that time, he, along with Annabelle Spencer, continued to promote the Falklands through their shop and the Falkland Islands Agency.



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
# Mount Lowe and Sapper Hill outposts

JOHN Allan 'puts the record straight' on the HMS Lancaster story and the two six inch guns situated at Canopus Hill, removed from the cruiser HMS Lancaster during World War I.

The story began late 1916 when the Admiralty decided to install the guns in order to prevent the high power wireless station at Port Stanley (by megabid) being bombarded by an enemy raider, and to obviate the necessity of keeping a cruiser at Port Stanley to protect the station when she could be employed elsewhere to better advantage.

Directions were given for the cruiser *HMS Lancaster* to land two six inch, mark VII guns for installation. Under the command of Captain J R Segrave R N. *HMS Lancaster* arrived in Port Stanley on December 24, 1916. Extracts from a despatch from Government House dated January 21, 1917 read:

"The landing of one gun commenced 19 January 1917. The distance from the landing to the Sapper Hill site is about a mile and a

half and to Mount Lowe about two miles. Each gun weighs seven and a half ton."

Further extracts from a despatch from Government House dated March 19, 1917 read

"HMS Lancaster landed and mounted two guns, one on Sapper Hill, the other on MountLowe then returned to the Pacific Coast February 9, 1917. At her time of departure the work of constructing magazines and shell rooms at the sites of the guns was in hand. This work has since been completed as well as the erection of a telephone line connecting Mount Lowe with Headquarters in Port Stanley. Sapper Hill was already connected.

"On leaving. HMS Lancaster landed two officers and five men for each gun. To complete the gun crews Captain Segrave requested

twenty five men and two signallers from the Falkland Islands Volunteer Force and this strength has been furnished."

The ammunition put ashore was 500 full charges of cordite and 900 armour piercing shells plus 200 other rounds. The officer commanding FIVF was Captain Newnham, Mount Lowe had a permanent crew of eleven while Sapper Hill had five or six permanent with six or seven as required. The following were the Falkland Islands Volunteers:- Corporals Newing, Etheridge, Brechin, and Rumbold. Privates T Hardy, R Clifton, Goss. Polien, Lanning, J. Lehen, F Allan (my father), Newman, S. Summers. Scott, W. Scott, J. Hollen. Stephen, Rieve, W Goodwin, C.F. King, Alf Summers, R Hutchinson. and Harries.

My father was stationed permanently on Mount Lowe until the outposts were withdrawn Christmas 1918 and was one who received gunnery instruction on board HMS Lancaster. The personnel from Lancaster left the Falklands on HMS Bristol January 10, 1919.

The photo shows part of the Mount Lowe gun crew with my father Fred Allan on the extreme right smoking a pipe. I do not know exactly when the Mount Lowe gun was moved but it was certainly at Canopus in the early 1930's and the Sapper Hill gun was moved there in 1943 by 200 men of the West Yorkshire Regiment. Both guns are situated in six metres depth of pure peat the photo (left) shows my father constructing the base to site the gun from Sapper Hill.

## Weather blocks South Pole rescue

SNOW and winds gusting to more than 45 mph grounded two planes on Monday, delaying the rescue of a seriously ill man working at the United States' South Pole research station.

The Twin Otters, built to fly in rough weather, were flown over the weekend from the southern tip of Chile to the Rothera Air Station on Antarctica, where they were forced to wait because of bad weather, said Valerie Carroll, spokeswoman for Raytheon Polar Services of Centennial, Colorado.

"This time of year in Antarctica is spring time so the weather is quite challenging." Carroll said.

The pilots expected the storm to ease and were hoping to fly to the South Pole on Tuesday, Steve Penikett, of the Kenn Borek Air charter company of Calgary, Alberta, told Canadian Press.

One plane was to make the 1,346-mile trip to the Amundsen-Scott South Pole Station, while the other was to remain at Rothera as a backup. At Amundsen-Scott on Monday, 10-mph winds accompanied temperatures of 93 below zero. The sun, which set in March, will not rise again until the middle of next week.

The ill employee works for Raytheon Polar Services, the logistics contractor for the National Science Foundation that manages the U.S. Antarctic research program. There are 57 staffers at the Amundsen-Scott station.

The worker's name was withheld. An update posted by the station's Web site said the man is able to work but has been ill for two weeks with bladder problems that could require surgery. The decision to airlift the man was made on Friday, the site said. The foundation's official policy is to attempt rescues only when illnesses are life-threatening. Raytheon medical director Dr. Ron Shemenski said over the weekend.

Shemenski himself was airlifted from the South Pole in April 2001 for gall bladder surgery after he diagnosed his own illness. In October 1999, Dr. Jerri Nielsen was flown out of Amundsen-Scott after detecting her own breast cancer. (MP)

## Annual ozone hole, biggest on record

SATELLITE observations (NOAA) suggest that this year's ozone hole is so far one of the biggest on record. The annual 'hole' has grown rapidly during August and now covers some 27 million square kilometres, larger than it has ever been at this time in early September

At the British Antarctic Survey's Halley Research Station ground-based ozone observations have commenced with the return of sunlight. These initial values are around 40% down on those measured before the ozone 'hole' and are comparable to those over the last decade.

We also have so many people to thank for all the cards, presents and messages of support since Charlie became ill.

The flood of concern from the Falkland Islands has given us the most amazing feeling of community spirit. It seemed to cushion me while the harsh reality of our situation sank in Thank you all so very much.

For anyone who doesn't know what I am talking about, I'll briefly fill you in.

While on holiday in England, Charlie (age 4) was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukaemia. Over a period of ten days he had become progressively more tired so we arranged to see a doctor. By then he was too weak to stand, was bloated, had strange black bruises and a temperature. Tests showed that his blood and hone marrow were jam-packed with cancerous cells.

During the eight weeks since, Charlie has been subjected to a range of treatments necessary to make him better - not pleasant.

He has had needles into his hips and spine, taking samples and injecting chemicals, transfusions of blood and plasma, thick syrup-like injections into his legs, up to four different medicines two or three times a day by mouth and various intravenous concoctions via a 'portacath', a valve now implanted in his chest leading into a vein.

Charlie will have to endure three intense periods of treatment dur-

ing which he will be very poorly. One is now over, the next will be in November/December and then in February/March. In between he is on maintenance levels of medication and we are currently watching him grow stronger by the day, until the next intense treatment knocks him back again.

Many people have told us that we will be on a rollercoaster of emotions for the next three years and that certainly seems to be the case. Looking back, the last two months feel more like two years, so much has changed.

Eight weeks ago Charlie could barely move. Four weeks ago he could walk a few steps. Two weeks ago he could climb a few stairs. Today he has been running around the house in his underpants and headband being a Teenage Mutant Hero Turtle. He has also had four screaming tantrums, thanks to the steroids he has to take.

Alongside this, we found that Charlie could be in great danger from spores in the old buildings plus hay and straw at my Dad's farm where we had been staying, so we were effectively homeless.

The news got worse when we were informed that we were not eligible for government funding since Charlie was taken ill outside the Falkland Islands. Thankfully this decision was reversed after a couple of weeks.

We are now installed in a small rented bungalow, furnished thanks to family, friends and IKEA

Charlie and Freddie have both started at their new school and wear their uniforms with pride.

Since Charlie will have a lim-

ited immune system throughout his treatment he is greatly at risk of catching illnesses or viruses.

Measles and chicken pox could be particularly life threatening. The treatment has caused all his hair to fall out and he has now grown a soft downy covering which other children seem to like to stroke!

If his temperature shoots up (or down) I have to take him straight to hospital. Otherwise we just visit one day a week for treatment, and then try to get on with life as normally as possible.

If this course of treatment should fail to work, there are two higher levels of treatment which Charlie could be moved up to. If they fail, then a bone marrow transplant would be necessary, if a suitable donor could be found.

There is an 80% success rate for this type of Leukaemia so, fingers crossed, we will be able to return home to Stanley in three years. Unfortunately Charlie can't go back before then as he will need specific blood transfusions during his treatment which are unavailable in the Falklands.

Mike is already home, preparing for the shearing season and earning money for us to spend - I expect a large proportion of it will go towards our overseas phone bill.

We'd love to hear from anyone who has time to write or phone.

It's lovely to hear all the local news, just don't expect a quick reply as I have a bit of a backlog.

When my family and I arrived in Stanley in June 1966, mutton, complete with boils/hydatids was 6d (2 1/2p) per lb. and beef (in winter) was 9d (4p) per lb.

We also only had one hour's morse contact with the outside world at 1200 hours GMT.

The Darwin sailed monthly, except when in Montevideo for its annual boiler de-scale when we could be eight weeks without physical contact with the rest of the world, no external air service then, and the cargo ship AES visited us three times a year.

Whilst not wanting to return to those obviously unhealthy and antiquated days, I just quote these figures as an example of the rapid strides the Falkland Islands have made in the last 40 years, due largely to the determined efforts of its inhabitants. Keep up the good work.


At present we are still closed

# Simunovic 'sustainable competitive advantage'

THE Chilean partner being considered by the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) was discussed by the Development Board (FIDB) at its meeting held on Tuesday.

FIDC General Manager, Julian Morris, gave the board a presentation on the Falkland Islands Meat Company's relationship with Punta Arenas businessman Nicholas Simunovic.

At their meeting earlier this month, the FIMCo held significant discussion on a possible deal with Mr Simunovic.


Mr Morris said the Falkland Islands meat industry needed a, "...sustainable competitive advantage," and at present it is difficult to see where this exists.

He said he had researched Mr Simunovic's references and was satisfied he could present such an advantage and would provide marketing and technical expertise, and access to new markets.

Mr Morris said Mr Simunovic will act as sales agent for the FIMCo on a commission rate of 6%; the FIMCo will maintain:

• 100% control over whom the product is sold to.

• 100% control over the selling



price.

●100% control over labelling.

Mr Morris added that the product will be sold with the FIMCo brand, not Mr Simunovic's and a long term deal must be struck (four years) with a six month notice period to withdraw from the agreement

Mutton and lamb markets

In his presentation. Mr Morris addressed the possibility of selling Falklands meat by size, not cat-

egory

He explained that the average mutton produced for sale in the Falklands last season was 20.5kgs while the average lamb sold in the UK was approximately 18.5kgs and to many manufacturers (of curry and ready meals, for example) are interested in portions - not the distinction between mutton and lamb - therefore mutton could be sold as lamb into such markets.

He insisted. "We're not look-

ing to pass mutton off as lamb ... we're looking for a product which suits the manufacturing marker."

Addressing concerns which might exist about such marketing, Chairman of the FIDB, Councillor Mike Summers agreed that while it was important for the FIMCo to behave "ethically", it was vital the company did not put, "... standards on ourselves that are not expected."

## Development assistance for Falklands businesses

THE Development Corporation (FIDC) is considering introducing a Business Development Assistance Scheme and phasing out its legal aid and financial management systems schemes

The Business Legal Aid Scheme and Financial Management Systems Scheme were introduced several years ago with the, "...intention of encouraging and promoting awareness and use of best practice in connection with legal and accounting procedures in the business environment."

In the last 3-4 years, the number of applications received by FIDC for both schemes has reduced and, according to FIDC Personal Busi-

ness Advisor. Jason Morris, both schemes should be discontinued

In a paper to the Board. Mr Morris said that historically FIDC staff have spent considerable amounts of time working with applicants on business plans and helping with production of financial forecasts and other information. Those staff are then required to make recommendations to the board based on that information.

"The juxtaposition of these two procedures is inappropriate and, furthermore, places a strain on FIDC resources."

FIDC General Manager, Julian Morris asked the board to approve

a proposal to introduce a Business Development Assistance Scheme, which will allow individuals and businesses to claim a 50% grant toward the cost of professional fees incurred in the production of business planning and financial infor-

He explained the scheme would alleviate the problems caused by having the same people who help to prepare business plans, "then moving to another room to judge the applications," adding that private sector advisors should have the benefit of the business.

The Board agreed the proposal provisionally, depending on, "... feedback from the public."

## Stanley Dairy herd age range too great

THE Falkland Islands Development Corporation is to hold a strategy review and is inviting its clients for their views.

FIDC inviting views

Senior Business Adviser, Fiona Didlick said a questionnaire is to be sent out to Falkland Islands businesses and government departments seeking views on such items as future growth in the economy and the role of FIDC.

It also researches the biggest obstacles that Falklands businesses face in terms of growth, ranging from obtaining finance, distance to markets, freight costs and office availability.

THE age range within the Stanley Dairy herd is loo great and Falklands Landholdings (FLH) anticipate negotiating with the Development Corporation a strategy to deal with the problem.

According to Operations Manager (FLH) Owen Summers, "Board Members requested a herd profile for Stanley Dairy as a start to an overall review of the business.

"It is quite evident from these profiles that the age range within the herd is too great, a structure, which was inherited from the previous owner."

He said, "Under normal operations one would not expect the older cows to be much greater than twelve years old and possibly up



to fourteen in the case of the exceptional good milker."

It is suggested that FLH should negotiate with FIDC a strategy for replacing all the older cows (currently in the age range 12-16 years) with those in the heifer herd over a period of two to three years.

"This should be done without compromising the quantity of milk being produced," emphasised Mr Summers in a background report from Tuesdays FLH meeting.

# New York revisited - An Islander experiences the anniversary of 9/11

AMBLING along Manhattan's 8th Avenue two years ago, my partner, Steve, and I passed the Midtown Fire Station.

In the open doors three scantily clad fire fighters leaned against the front of their appliance, unashamedly enjoying the late summer sun.

"Waiting to be admired by the tourists," I joked to Steve.

With characteristic brashness he yelled to the guys, "My girlfriend says you're posing for the girlies..."
"It's all part of the service

ma'am." they laughed back.

We continued the half block to the hotel comparing the friendliness of the New York emergency services with their rather bad tempered shop assistants.

Just two days later, one day after we left New York, fifteen of the men from that station died in the terrorist attacks on the Trade Centre.

To find ourselves standing outside the same station on the second anniversary of 9/11 was, I admit, the result of nothing more than a series of coincidences.

After attending a family wedding in Yosemite, California, we had arranged four nights in New York to catch a show and do some dedicated shopping in Bloomingdales.

It wasn't until we had almost landed at JFK Airport that it occurred to us that the anniversary was only a few days away.

When we arrived at our hotel – booked over the internet – I was also taken aback to discover it was situated only a stone's throw from the one we had stayed in two years ago, three doors down from the Midtown Fire Station on the corner of 8th Avenue and 48th St.

Like two years before we were awoken frequently during the night by the wail of the fire appliances leaving the station, but this time I don't think it too melodramatic to say that the cry of the sirens held for us a rather more haunting significance.

Still I steadfastly avoided becoming too emotionally entangled in the much TV and radio publicised build-up to the anniversary. After all what right had I to feel any degree of sadness? I had lost no family, friends or colleagues. It seemed to me it would be egotistic and insincere to allow myself any morbid tears for a tragedy not my own.

But it was unavoidable.

As a result of an accidental sojourn across the Brooklyn Bridge on the subway (due to Steve's lack of patience with the subway map), on the return trip I noticed that our train passed through the Cortland Street Station – the stop for Ground Zero.

So on the eve of the anniversary we trudged up the steps, mentally preparing ourselves for the inevitable horrors of a vast and sad expanse festooned with Japanese tourists and opportunities for tacky souvenirs.

And we were right.

But what we hadn't prepared

ourselves for was, despite the crowds, the palpable presence of an overwhelming, awe-inspiring silence, thick with an indescribable degree of emotion and respect.

Yes, there were pretzel stands and mobile toilets and NYPD t-shirts, but that was nothing compared to the sight of the surviving towering architecture that encircled the gaping hole - quite literally a massive well of thoughts and feelings of memories, love, loss, sadness and wondrous solemnity.

The tourists stood quietly gazing into the fenced site, or stared up at the skyline and flags, or simply rested on concrete benches with their hands folded. The souvenir sellers spoke rarely and even the camera crews and celebrity news frontmen and women were unusually subdued.

Ground Zero seemed a universe away from the clamour, clatter, chatter and neon of Times Square

The following day, September 11, we called at the Fire Station where photographs of the lost men of Engine 54, Ladder 4, Battalion 9, were on display to the public.

After paying our respects we stepped across the road to the Pigalle Italian Restaurant, and like dozens of others in the open faced cafe, appreciated the drama of two fire engines roaring past with the stars and stripes flying ostentatiously out behind. The firemen stared out grave faced but deservedly enjoying the admiration and respect they were attracting from all sides.

The atmosphere in the café was warm and friendly and held a hint of camaraderie unusual in a big city—in fact not unlike the feeling that encompasses the crowd that gathers in the Town Hall in the Falkland Islands on June 14—the anniversary of the Liberation.

Of course not everything was as honourable or sincere. If one thing did mar the anniversary it was the attempts by the Republican party to exploit the memory of the dead

On every other television channel, in barely veiled party political broadcasts, Republican politicians spouted about morality and spirituality and "spiking" terrorism.

I have no doubt the sabre rattling seemed as crass and inappropriate to American citizens as it did to tourists, particularly when viewed next to broadcasts of children reading the names of the dead at memorial ceremonies around the United States.

Still I am glad we were there and able to experience just a little of what New Yorkers feel on the anniversary of 9/11.

#### New York today

But don't get me wrong, this is no city obsessed with loss.

New York is no graveyard.
This outrageously in-your-face city is one of the most eelectic, exciting and worthy tourist destinations in the world.

Each time Steve and I have vis-

ited, we have been frustrated by the lack of hours in the day. Call it a cliché but in New York, you don't want to go to bed in case you miss something.

No matter how many times I visit Times Square I never fail to be uplifted by the monumentally garish neon, the banter of the street sellers, the flyers, the music and the excitement of other visitors – and Steve never fails to spend a small fortune in the massive Virgin Megastore.

Even buying cosmetics can be a intriguing experience.

I watched mouth agape in Duane Reade pharmacy as a young manager loudly, and for almost twenty minutes, berated a female shoplifter.

"Shame on you, shame, shame,"

he yelled

"I come to America from India and I get a job, you. YOU, a citizen of the United States, from Queens, you have no job and you come to my shop and you steal from me. I say to you—you get a job, not steal from me What would your mother say if she knew you were a thief?... Shame SHAME on you."

Interestingly enough he let her go without calling the police. But from her miserable expression I suspect she might have preferred a night in the cells to the twenty minute 80 decibel lecture in full view of all other customers.

But why is New York so special? Isn't it just a dangerous, brash,

expensive, metropolis?

Well all of that is true of any city, but I have never yet felt intimidated in New York, even on the subway, which seems little different from any European underground.

The people can be either incredibly charming or shocking brusque—but either way they're interesting, colourful and almost always helpful. And believe me when I say, a cute little English accent is no disadvantage in The Big Apple.

The shopping is almost incomparable (and foreign visitors qualify for free gifts and discounts if they register with visitors desk in Maceys and Bloomingdales), but just as fun are the China town shops, high streets

retailers and the street stalls; and you cannot visit New York without stopping off at the Diamond and Jewellery Exchange district on East 47th.

And of course the shows are out of this world. Be certain to book into a hotel in the Manhattan Theatre District. If you purchase tickets for one of the many, musicals, comedies or dramas you won't have too far to trot in your high heels as the hotels sit on the same blocks as the theatres

Choose a midweek show when the crowds are less and your \$50 tickets could well be converted to \$100 seats or even better.

What to watch? It doesn't really matter because everything is fabulous. But, providing you're not an opera snob, then go for a musical. The sets, the songs, the colour and the music will blow your mind.

For youngsters, or just the plain shallow and romantic, I highly recommend Disney's Aida - music and lyrics by Elton John and Tim Rice - and currently starring the marvellous RnB diva Toni Braxton.

Food, food, food – its unbelievably, consistently excellent. But whatever you eat, whether Japanese or Thai or Afghan or Chinese or Mexican, or good old prime rib USA, it is vital that you take a trip to Little Italy just a few subway stops south and have a meal in one of the line of Italian Restaurants on Mulberry Street

Time it right and you could find yourself caught up in one of their Saints Day festivals when more than a million people will pass along Mulberry Street in only four days.

But what about pubs and clubs? Again the choice is frighteningly endless, but if you're a jazz fan then head for the world famous 'Birdland' on West 44th. Rock, pop, opera, rhythm and blues, dance or rap you'll find a club catering specifically to your taste.

Apart from speciality music clubs, art gallerys and museums there are countless wine bars where you can sit in the window drink potent Marguerites and (quite literally) watch the world go past, or swill lager in pubs where tourists and locals yell at screens showing American Football.

Want to take a wander through chic Greenwich Village (always referred to as The Village) make sure to lay your hands on a copy of 'The Village Voice' to discover what's on offer in terms of entertainment and shopping.

As you might have already gathered I LOVE New York.


The only problem I have ever encountered was trying to persuade Steve that the ballet was preferable to an evening with punk band The Rayonettes.



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# General Practice

with the KEMH Medical Engineering Department

THE Hospital Medical Engineering Department are currently involved in the development of Critical Systems Policy and Procedural Documents.

These systems can be expensive, complex and require a high degree of management and maintenance.

Each critical system has been identified based on the essential need and if this equipment was to fail it would have major impact on patient services within the hospital.

We have identified sixteen critical systems within the KEMH.

These are:-

- •Sterilisation (plant and equipment associated with the sterilisation of theatre, medical and dental instruments)
- Medical Gases (oxygen generation and piped oxygen, nitrous oxide, medical air and suction services used for patient treatment)

X-Ray equipment (diagnostic equipment)

 Electrical Systems (power and lighting systems and standby generations systems)

 Medical Equipment (defribrillators, ventilators, anaesthetic machines, patient monitors, etc)

Dental equipment

- Pathology diagnostic equipment
- •Energy Management and Associated Plant (boilers, hot water plant and heating services associated with air conditioning and ventilation plants)

•Legionella and Water Services (Legionella prevention [health care establishments are high risk] and provision of hygienic hot and cold water services)

• Lifts and Lifting Equipment (equipment used in the lifting of patients to aid mobility, treatment or bathing needs)

• Fire Safety (patient and staff evacuation training and maintenance of fire alarm system)

• Electrical patient aids and communication equipment (community care phone system and ward nurse call system)

● COSHH (control of substances hazardous to health that are used within the hospital – identifying risk to hospital personnel.)

Infection Control

• Serious Incident Reporting System (reporting of dangerous/ hazardous incidents and review of risk)

• Air conditioning and Ventilation (theatre and ITU air conditioning – provision of clean areas)

We are currently using the appropriate parts of UK NHS Technical Memorandums, Medical Device Agency Documentation and European Standards and identifying known risk to produce a local workable standard for each of the critical systems.

Each critical system will identify the designated personnel to ensure the compliance with the policy document and its safe use.

The policy will also identify a maintenance programme for all the associated equipment and identify

appropriate level of storage of parts and training needs, both for maintenance purposes and user requirements

The maintenance of medical equipment can be very expensive, for instance, a typical 6 monthly manufacturers service on the anaesthetic machines would cost the hospital in the region of £8.000.


To compliment the critical systems, training of maintenance staff by manufacturers has been undertaken in recent years and to ensure that equipment can be maintained locally, two trainees have been-undertaking both manufacturer and vocational courses to ensure the continued compliance to each critical system and that this will be achievable for the long term.

All medical equipment, x-ray equipment, oxygen generation and medical gas equipment are all maintained locally with the back up of UK manufacturers support.

Along with well-maintained equipment it is important that staff receive appropriate training on the use and safety of all the equipment. To achieve this, training programmes will be incorporated within each policy and staff will be nominated to provide the training requirements.

It is hoped that all the critical systems work will be completed within the next 12 months.

The main objective is to provide a safe, clean environment with well maintained equipment for all patients and staff and that when equipment is urgently needed it is available.

# Recipes for the Falkland Islands

Calamari with Tomato Sauce

Tasty squid, sauteed in a garlic and tomato sauce, served over linguine

## Ingredients

- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 3 cloves garlie, sliced
- 1 785g can tomato puree
- 840ml water
- 120ml red wine
- l teaspoon salt
- Iteaspoon white sugar
- red pepper to taste 450g package of linguine pasta
- 1.4kg squid, cleaned and sliced into rings

#### Directions

Heat olive oil in a large saucepan over a medium heat. Stir in the garlic and cook until lightly brown.

Stir in tomato puree, water, red wine, salt, sugar and crushed red pepper. Bring to the boil.

Reduce heat and simmer for 30 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to the boil. Add linguine and cook for 8-10 minutes, or until a dente, drain.

Stir calamari into the tomato puree mixture. Continue to simmer for approximately 15 minutes.

Check frequently to avoid over cooking squid. Serve squid and sauce over cooked linguine.

# Wool market report for week ending September 12

#### GENERAL OVERVIEW

Greasy wool prices were quite strongly affected by currency movements at sales last week.

In Australia greasy wool prices slipped in terms of Australian currency, but when expressed in terms of pounds Stirling, did not move too much at all.

As shown in the Micron Price Guide, greasy wool prices fell marginally at the fine end of the market (except super fine), but gained a few pence per kilogram clean at the broader end of the micron spectrum.

Wool analysts are starting to talk of orders being placed for tops in the early part of 2004 and also of the need for China to re-commence buying wool in "about a months time" (Wool Record Weekly). As such the current wool market position is being described as having a solid base, which augers well for the Falkland Islands upcoming shearing season.

New Zealand sales were reported as generally mixed. This is believed to also be a consequence of the appreciation of the NZ \$ relative to the US \$.

In total 51,374 bales of wool were offered for sale during the week, with 38,434 bales purchased by the trade. Pass in rate averaged 25.1%

Included in the offering were 3,653 bales of crossbred wool, of which 3,094 bales were sold. (pass in rate 15.3%).

56.000 bales are rostered for sale in Australia. 5.000 bales in South Africa and a sale in New Zealand.



# Pinochet is a 'cheeky old dictator'

FORMER Chilean dictator Augusto Pinochet was in the limelight during the recent commemoration of the September 11 (thirtieth anniversary) when he violently toppled elected Socialist president Salvador Allende imposing a 17 year military dictatorship.

A Santiago newspaper surfaced a 2001 interview with the old dictator by James Whelan an American historian writing his biogra-

Among the most derogatory remarks are those that referred to the first two democratically elected presidents while Pinochet was Commander in Chief of the Army: Mr Patricio Aylwin (1990-94) described him as "Chile's worst president ever, he's a b\*\*," and Mr Eduardo Frei defines the retired dictator as "inoffensive and silly."

When asked how President Allende felt when finding out that his most trusted military officer and commander of the Army was leading the coup against him in September 1973, Mr. Pinochet laughed saying. "Of course... I never told him, even when I was the commander of the Army of his choosing.

ing.
"And do you know who proposed me?" asked Pinochet. "the Communist Party. They certainly were wrong with me."

Insisting with former President

Aylwin, Mr Pinochet said "the b\*\* was always conspiring with the Christian Democrats in degrading my government and achievements." This in spite of the fact that Mr. Aylwin in 1973 justified the military coup saying the bloodshed could have been avoided if "President Allende had convened a referendum on his administration."

As to "silly" Mr Frei. Pinochet recalls that "you'd go and see him to inform about a situation, he would keep silent and ended the conversation by saying he would think about it and would later give a reply."

In reference to his 503 days arrested in the United Kingdom in 1998 when Spanish Judge Baltasar Garzon wanted him extradited to Spain to face human rights abuse charges, Mr. Pinochet said, "they wanted to destroy me, but I eluded them." However the toughest while in Britain was, ". when several European countries began fighting over my body." The UK government finally released him on, "humanitarian reasons" and on March 3, of 2000 he was flown back to Santiago where a massive concentration of followers received him.

"Judge Garzón is a very ambitious man, he comes from a very poor background and it's understandable that he should be so ambitious," added Pinochet in reference to the Spanish magistrate

The former dictator insists he was not involved in the so called "death caravan," a military group that immediately after the coup travelled north of Chile killing opponents and protestors.

"I had nothing to do with that. Chilean courts only have deductions against me." Similarly with the killing in Buenos Aires in 1974 of the former Commander in Chief of the Chilean Army. General Carlos Pratts and his wife when a bomb went off in their car.

"I swear on the memory of my parents I had nothing to do with that," stressed Pinochet.

Nevertheless Mr Pinochet complained of the vileness of Chilean courts. "I never expected Judge Juan Guzmán Tapia to be so vicious against me. And I named him a high court judge! What a wild beast....I believe he has a French wife that is Socialist...."

The published interview had immediate reactions. Socialist Senator Jaime Gazmuri said "I've always had the worst opinion of Pinochet since he betrayed Allende. I can still see him acting with deference, respect and faithfully, but then it turned out he was leading the coup, he's an outright traitor."

Andrés Zaldívar, president of the Chilean Senate was less passionate: "we know what he stands for his government had some economic successes but was a complete failure because it conducted Chile to destruction, division, hatred, rancour and left the country littered with tortured and dead bodies."

Socialist Senator Ricardo Núñez pointed out that the interview reveals a, "perverse soul" and if the date is 2001, "...it is quite clear Pinochet was not mentally alienated or ill but in full capacities and should have stood for trial.

"Pinochet lives in the past and has yet to understand he was defeated by democratic forces. President Aylwin belongs to the great history of this country, the man who pacified Chile, that not only defeated the dictatorship but set the foundations for an integrated, more united and solidarity sensitive Chile," indicated Senator Jorge Pizarro.

Communist representative Gladys Marin simply remarked that Pinochet, "...represents the worst of humanity and to keep talking about him, no longer matters."

Government spokesperson Francisco Vidal, the only member of the current administration to comment Pinochet interview said.

"...he reflects a hatred and rancour that belong to the past, and they certainly don't represent the Chilean people's affections."

## Ozone day in Punta Arenas

PUNTA Arenas celebrated this Tuesday the international Preservation of the ozone layer day with the inauguration of several "light" metres that indicate ultra violet rays intensity and alert the local population to seek protection.

The mobile meters in school buses similar to red, yellow traffic lights plus a solar meter in compliance with United Nations and the World Heath Organization, WHO, standards are part of the local authorities' campaign to instruct residents about ultra violet radiation and photo protection.

The Punta Arenas ceremony coincides with a United Nations world campaign to educate children about the dangers of over exposure to solar rays.

"By reducing children and teenagers exposure to the sun we can substantially reduce the risks of skin cancer, cataracts and other related injuries that only appear later in life," said Dr. Lee Jong-wook director general of WHO in Geneva on launching the international cam-

WHO's objective in coordination with the UN Environmental Program Intersun is that all schools in the world follow the examples of Australia and the United States.

"Since a significant part of solar exposure takes place before children reach 18, it's evident that teaching children about the future hazards of solar exposure is crucial, and school programmes have shown to be the most effective way to communicate and educate infants," added Dr. Lee Jong-wook.

With the gradual thinning of the ozone layer the risks of skin cancer and cataracts have ballooned and WHO estimates that 3 million people catch non malign melanomas and 130,000 malign melanomas every year.

Currently one of five North American residents will experiment skin cancer sometime in their lives, indicated WHO Director general.

WHO estimates that cataracts have caused blindness in almost 15 million people, 20% of which are believed to have originated in sun over exposure in countries close to the equator, such as India and Pakistan, de the risks of UV rays in the official curricula,

## Red tide strikes southern Chile

PARTICULARLY high readings of red tide forced Chilean fisheries and sanitary authorities to close Puerto Edén in Patagonia for the extraction of bivalve molluses.

The environmental health department of Puerto Natales hospital is responsible for the micro toxic readings of molluscs extracted in the extreme south of Chile.

Puerto Edén a small fishing village has repeatedly been exposed to red tide and the latest readings in the area are as follows: Carlos Sur. 403 micrograms; Morton island. 487 micrograms, Salamandra Island. 288; Ckawana. 261; Falsa point, 194; Crossover island. 96 and Foot island. 181. The readings correspond to September 9 mussel extraction. Microgram toxicity limit per hundred grams of flesh is 80.

The information was passed onto Punta Arenas fisheries and health authorities who immediately declared a ban on mollusc extraction in a eighty miles range with epicentre in Puerto Edén.

## Massive chilean tourist exodus

OVER 20,000 Chileans are expected to travel to Mendoza, Argentina, beginning this Wednesday to coincidence with the national independence holiday that will extend over the weekend.

According to the Chilean Tourist Office a million Santiago residents will be leaving town for the camp or sea resorts, and another million in the provinces have decided to travel to other places or overseas.

The sea resorts of Viña del Mar and La Serena expect 400,000 visitors and Mendoza where Santiago residents can drive by crossing the Liberators Pass in the Andes will be attracting over 20,000 tourists. "We're satisfied, tourism is picking up again both domestic and overseas. We're 10% above recent years' average, and our information indicates that hotel, hostel and national park reservations are in the range of 80 to 90%," said Oscar Santelices, Director of the Chilean Tourist Office.

Since the devaluation of the Argentine currency, and given the strong appreciation of the Chilean peso, Chileans are regularly crossing the border and have become habitués of Buenos Aires, Bariloche, Mendoza plus Río Gallegos and Comodoro Rivadavia in the extreme south of the Argentine Patagonia.

## Falklands pupils 'will miss thirty weeks education during their school lives'

THE Director of Education Sylvia Cole has reported that some Falkland Islands pupils will miss 30 weeks of their education during their school lives

Mrs Colc says these children are missing essential learning points, tests and assessments, subject content and school celebrations as a result of missing school.

The Department is looking in to making enforceable the Ordinance that requires parents ensure the attendance of their child at school during term-time.

Mrs Cole says the problem is caused by parents taking children on holiday during term-time "Some parents take two to three week's extra holiday each year (often tagged on to the winter school holiday) when their children should be

John Farrow, the Headteacher of the Infant Junior School made the following points

The education process is not unlike the construction of a wall First, the foundation is laid during Pre-School and Reception. Once this is laid a course is added every year until pupils leave school. For the wall to be sound, each course requires bricks to be laid in order across its whole length. If bricks are missed out the next course will not be sound. If every course has a brick or two missing the wall will collapse. I doubt very much if anyone would accept a wall with bricks periodically missed out.

There is no good time to remove a child from school as the structured curriculum is cumulative and builds on previous input. Every week in school is of value and importance otherwise we should not be delivering it. Absence means that the pupil is involved in playing catch up.

Their return will coincide with the beginning, middle or end of areas of study. If the former, they will miss the end consolidation from the previous topics, if the next they will have missed the initial input, if the latter they will miss the broadening and development of the topic.

"Children, on return, need to be brought up to speed again and familiarised with the aspects they have missed. The teacher, however brief this may be, needs to neglect other pupils in order to provide this input. The basis for education is the curriculum which is taught every day, this is the core and represents planned, continuous and progressive input.

Alan Purvis, Headteacher at FICS added. "Absence resulting from family holidays has been a cause for concern for some time. It is detrimental to learning in two

"Firstly, the learning of the student on holiday suffers because work missed is rarely caught up with; setting holiday work without teacher input is not a solution; significant sections of work or coursework are often missed leaving gaps in knowledge that may never be filled. Secondly, the learning of the rest of the class suffers.

## Governor talks fish policy to Vigo press

NEW fisheries policy in the Falkland Islands was the focus of a press conference held by His Excellency the Governor Howard Pearce at the World Fishing Exhibition in Vigo last week.

According to fishing company representative Hamish Wylie, "The show was well attended by representatives of many Falkland Island companies - it gave them a good opportunity to discuss further development of their businesses, and the industry in light of the new fisheries policy

He said that at the Governor's press conference the main interest from the press was in connection with the new policy.

The Falkland Islands are planning a number of changes to fisheries policy including current Falkland Island participants in the fishery benefitting in the first instance from the allocation of fishing rights under the new policy.

This means the award of rights will be based on the company's ef-

fort history.

Fishing companies will also receive tax relief on the purchase of

Whether or not ownership of long term rights should be open exclusively to status holders is currently pending advice from the Foreign Office.

The expansion of maritime services is also being investigated as well as inshore fishing.

Mr Wylie said, "The Governor met with numerous companies and visited processing plants and fishing boats.

Director of Fisheries John Barton, Councillor Richard Cockwell and other private sector representatives were in Korea and Japan this week to meet with the same companies.

## Want to be a permanent resident? You'll be needing a reference

IN future applications for Permanent Residence Permits will have to be supported by references.

Following on from last month's discussions about Permanent Residence Permits (PRPs) members of Executive Council (ExCo) this month took note of the work which is still ongoing on the guidance notes and application forms for PRPs, confirmed Acting Governor Harriet Hall.

She said, "They also considered the question of the charges which applicants for PRP or for Status must pay. Although there will be no change to the fees for applications, which cover the administration costs of processing the application, they decided to change the application system so that applications for PRPs could be made in the first instance without medical examinations.

"Applications would then be approved subject to satisfactory medical clearance. Once this approval in principle was given, an applicant would then have to have a medical examination at the same cost as currently applies.

"The difference is that an applicant will not have to pay for a medical if their application is unsuccess-

"Of course, if the medical examination shows that there are medical reasons why a person should not be given PRP status for example they will be a large burden on the Falklands health system - then ExCo can reconsider the decision and may turn the application down."

## No taxation on road camp food value

TAXATION matters were high on the agenda at September's meeting of Executive Council.

Acting Governor Harriet Hall said, "There were discussions on a number of matters related to taxation, such as the definition of selfemployment, the tax status of employees working at the Falkland Islands Government Office in London, and the question of taxation on accommodation and food at road building camps.

"This last point arose because it was felt to be unfair to tax workers on road construction projects in Camp on the value of their food and, in certain cases, accommoda-

"The sums raised from such taxation were minimal, but it was a big disincentive for people considering taking on this work

"Members therefore agreed that workers employed on publicly funded road construction and maintenance programmes should be exempt from taxation in respect of the accommodation and food benefits they received."

She said there was also a general discussion about taxation of benefits, in particular the implications for tax purposes of being self-employed. "...and members will consider this subject further in the future."

## New rates of freight to be calculated

WORK is to begin on the calculating of new rates for freight transport around the islands.

Speaking of the discussion held at ExCo, Acting Governor Harriet Hall said, "The detailed work on this remains to be done, but Members agreed the principle that work should be based on the concept of freight rate equalisation in respect of coastal shipping."

This means that for shipping freight to essential ports - for example those that depend on shipping for their economic and social viability - a set subsidy based on volume will be applied, regardless of distance

Miss Hall said, "This is because the cost of the service to government is fixed, no matter where the vessel calls.

"At the same time as looking in more detail at coastal shipping charges, members agreed that FIGAS freight subsidies should also be discussed, although as different circumstances apply, there will be different considerations to take into

## Holiday credits only for children with status

THE Holiday Credit Scheme which awards £1 per day to adults and 50p per day to children to assist in travel overseas has been amended once again in terms of who qualifies for the scheme.

Acting Governor Harriet Hall told Penguin News, "Executive Council agreed a change to the Holiday Credits Scheme to ensure that only those children with Falkland Islands status receive the credits.

"At the moment the scheme applies to all children who are born here, regardless of whether or not they are citizens of the Falkland Islands. The change will narrow the definition of eligibility to make it clear who is intended to benefit from the scheme.

## Court news

## Three alcohol related offences for Magistrates Court

THREE alcohol related offences were dealt with in the Magistrates Court in front of Senior Magistrate Nick Sanders on Wednesday October 24.

Peter William Brooks of Stanley, on a charge of 'driving whilst over the prescribed limit, (Section 21), entered a plea of not guilty. The case was adjourned until Tuesday November 4 2003.

Hugh Ferguson, for Ledingham Chalmers, acting in defence, pointed out that his client had entered the not guilty plea on the basis of an issue raised, that being evidence that would require further advice. The question of post driving consumption of alcohol would need expert advice which was unobtainable at such short notice.

Senior Magistrate Nick Sanders told Mr Brooks, previously remanded on the condition not to drive a motor vehicle." due to the lengthy time of adjournment it would be unfair to maintain the

condition of bail."

Gene Stanley Bernsten faced three charges relating to an incident on September 16 initiated in the Globe Tavern.

Police received a 999 call for assistance from the Globe Tavern just before 1 lpm, closely followed by a further call to say a fight had broken out.

The Police found Mr Bernsten in an extremely agitated and aggressive state following an incident involving a resident of Hillside Camp. Local Fireman Bryn Rozee had attempted to calm Mr. Bernsten resulting in an altercation taking place between themselves.

Mr Bernsten continued to display violent tendencies throughout the arrest, journey to the Police Station and being placed in a cell.

Senior Crown Counsel Mr. Cripps prosecuting, referred to the case as "...a nasty, violent incident, lasting fifteen minutes, during which time a number of people feared for their safety."

The case was adjourned until October 10 for pre-sentence reports to be prepared. Mr Bernsten was released on bail under the conditions that he does not enter any licensed premises and ensures that he attends all appointments with the probation officer.

Senior Magistrate Nick Sanders stressed "...all options for sentencing remain open to me."

In relation to this case Bryn Thomas Rozee had a charge of assault by beating, withdrawn on condition that he agree to be bound over to keep the peace for a period of 12 months in the sum of £400.

Senior Magistrate Nick Sanders told Mr Rozee "...you were involved in something you should stay clear of, this is not a punishment it is a promise to the court to be of good behaviour for a period of 12 months, make sure you don't come back to the courts again."

## Thirty days off

"The extra support which a returning student needs is given by a teacher at the expense of other students.

"Parents expect the schools to do their best to ensure that all students achieve their potential.

"Parents and students must understand that absences from school will make a negative contribution to the pupil's overall achievement, despite the school's best effort to ensure success."

Sylvia Cole, the Director of Education, summed up the feelings of everyone in the Education Department: "Think of the controversy around the changes to the academic year. Parents, understandably, wanted to know how much their children would 'suffer' if they missed one term. Could it ever be made up? Would the children's education be damaged forever? Parents were reassured that teachers would modify the curricu-lum; ensure that all areas were covered; every child would receive the same input on the key areas; no one would miss out. By the end of August this had happened; the teachers were exhausted; the children had worked hard; SATs results and GCSE results were satisfactory because this had been a planned process for all children.

"If children miss weeks of learning, when other children are still in school, they will suffer. Parents cared deeply about the possibility of their child missing twelve weeks, once in their school lives. I hope we have reassured them that, because of careful planning, the children did not 'suffer' and are at a good, advanced stage of tearning, equal to children of their age, in other parts of the world, where educational opportunities are well-advanced."

Unenforceable?


It is a requirement of the Education Ordinance 1989 that parents ensure the attendance of their child at school during term-time.

# Life on the ocean wave

A VESSEL far from its fishing grounds in Falmouth is is now high, dry and undergoing renovations in Stanley.

Owner Chris May told Penguin News that prior to her arrival in the Falklands *Theo* worked out of Falmouth as a stern/side, trawler/ dredge fishing for scallops.

Theo is 11.3 metres long, 4.3 metres wide, built of 6mm steel of hard chine construction. Built in 1988/89 and commissioned in 1990 she is approximately 20 ton and has an average speed of 7.5 knots.

Chris explained "....I purchased the *Theo* in Plymouth and had her transported to the Falklands on board an MoD cargo ship last November. She remained at MPA until February when Val Berntsen and I motored in to Stanley where she was berthed at the Coastel jetty until the end of July."

The Theo was lifted out of the water and shifted to lan Bury's yard to undergo bulwarks refit due to extensive wear from steel dredge nets to the bulwark and rail. Chris said this is why he is currently re-

## A hearty choice - PN questions Falklands women

A HEALTHY heart is vital for living life to the full, regardless of your age and gender, but while over 60% of women identify breast cancer as their greatest health concern, deaths among women due to heart disease and stroke, are more than eight times higher.

That's why World Heart Day this year is focused on just how important it is for women all over the world to have a heart for life. Women and Heart Disease is this year's World Heart Day theme.

But heart disease and stroke are largely preventable though healthy lifestyles

Here in the Falklands Penguin News investigated how some of the women of the Falkland Islands look after their health and heart in terms of smoking, exercise, diet and drinking habits.

We approached forty women between the age of 18 and 65 (with the majority falling in the 25-45 bracket) and asked them:

- 1. Do you smoke?
- 2. What type of exercise do you undertake?
- 3. It is recommended that we consume five portions of fruit and vegetables per day. How often do you eat fruit and vegetables -
  - a. Five portions a day.
  - b. Once a day or more.
  - c. A few portions a week,
  - d. Never.
- 4. It is advised that women if they drink, consume less than 14 units per week - do you feel your alcohol consumption would be within this limit?

The response to Question 1 was encouraging with 65% nonsmokers and 35% smokers.

Two of the nonsmokers had given up less than a year ago.

A small number of the smokers said they had tried to give up smoking on countless occasions and "...will probably keep on trying."

In terms of exercise only 7.5% admitted they did none at all. 32.5% were very serious about exercise and undertook a variety of sports around three times a week, including gym work-outs. running, circuit training, squash, tennis and swimming.

The remainder said they walked regularly or were kept fit with their farm work.

Interestingly, absolutely no-

body said they ate the recommended five portions of fruit and vegetables per day. In fact most felt this to be an excessive amount.

100% said they are one or more portions of fruit and vegetables per day, but after closer questioning it appeared that a number of women consume closer to three portions (1 portion veg. 1 fruit, 1 fruit juice).

Others attempted to claim one portion of potatoes as their 'veg-

etables' for the day... sorry but it doesn't count.

Things were more or less half and half when it came to alcohol consumption.

52.5% said they drank within the recommended 14 units but the other 47.5% said "no chance," with a generous amount of those admitting they probably consumed more than 14 units just on a Saturday night at the pubs.

So, apart from the binge drinking we're not the unhealthiest people in the world, then again there's definitely room for improvement.

So what can we do for the sake of our heart?

#### Healthy Eating

Too much saturated fat from red meat, burgers, sausages, pies, biscuits, cakes, chips and dairy products can clog up your arteries and put a strain on your heart.

However, eating fish, poultry and vegetables and fruit, can all help. Fill up on good carbohydrates like brown rice, pasta and whole-meal bread and potatoes. Don't add salt to food and watch out for hidden salt in processed foods.

#### Be More Active

Half an hour a day makes all the difference and this can be included in your daily routine.

Start off gently and build-up gradually.

#### Be Smoke Free

From the moment you stop smoking, the risk of heart attack starts to reduce and is halved after one year of stopping smoking.

#### Reduce Alcohol

Binge drinking will increase your risk of having a heart attack.

#### Trim Excess Weight

By eating a balanced diet, drinking alcohol with moderation and increasing your levels of physical activity, you can maintain a healthy body and heart.

## Get fit without even trying

#### At work:

- Leave the Land Rover at home. Walk to work or ask your partner or friend to drop you only part of the way.
- Walk around during the workday break or at lunchtime
- Go and speak to someone instead of using the phone or email
- Stand while on the phone
- Schedule exercise time into your calendar (take your kit to work so that you can go straight to the gym while you're still motivated).

#### Plan outings and holidays that include exercise:

- Take your children on a battle field tour or get some information from Falklands Conservation and go and spot birds or plants.
- Walk, run, or fly a kite at Surf Bay.
- •Don't drive to the shop, walk, jog or cycle.
- Drink less at the pub and dance instead.
- •Find activities that suit your environment

## 'Portions' of fruit and veg defined

- -A medium apple or banana (80g)
- -A bowl of mixed salad (80g)
- -3 tablespoons of peas or carrots (80g)
- -Any amount of 100% fruit or vegetable juice (only once a day)
- -Any amount of beans or pulses (only once a day)
- -Any amount of green beans
- -Any amount of 100% concentrated puree

## Lack of expertise

WHEN we sold our milk producer/ retailer business. Stanley Dairy Ltd. to the Falkland Islands Development Corporation just over a year ago I believed we had handed over a viable operation

It appears from the Falkland Island Development Board report in last week's Penguin News, that this is not the case.

At hand-over there was a mixed age group of milking cattle ranging from heifers in the early stages of their first lactation up to the three remaining cattle imported by us in 1986.

These old timers were still capable of producing satisfactory quantities of milk but were being retained mainly to prolong their bloodlines by producing a few more calves.

There were also 26 heifers of breeding age handed over. With appropriate management these animals should have been perfectly adequate to ensure the continuation of milk production at the dairy for

the foreseeable future

If there are current problems at the dairy it is likely that it is due to a lack of expertise and experience at all levels of operations and management rather than the fault of the previous owners or the quality of the available livestock

## Burnerd claims 'I'm innocent'

AS most local readers of the Penguin News will be aware, there is a tendency for sheep to rush onto the road between Stanley and Goose Green - too near for drivers to take safe evasive action - consequently the animal's life is lost under the wheels of the vehicle.

For your readers overseas, let me give the details of August 3, when I was the driver of a minibus returning two personnel to Mount Pleasant Airport

Because most of the road is unfenced the death rate of animals due to such accidents, such as I was involved in, is very high. On some occasions cattle and horses have been injured or killed on this road.

On August 3 in the vicinity of the Victory Bar, at about 8.35pm, I collected two passengers for delivery to Mount Pleasant Airport. They quickly fell asleep

In the vicinity of Mount William I passed what looked like a stationery military vehicle, and assumed that one of the occupants could be relieving themselves, so continued.

Because there have been so many accidents on this road (about 3/4 of it rough gravel, and bordered on either side by a deep drainage ditch, where quite a number of both civilian and military personnel have been killed) I, realising the dangers, restrict my speed to a maximum of 60km an hour. In some places it is necessary to reduce that speed dramatically due to potholes.

On this relatively dark evening. everything was going well. As I descended the slight slope towards Split Creek, I noticed a small cut of sheep just ahead of me at the side of the built-up road where they are often seen sheltering from the wind and weather.

Normally sheep in this situation ignore passing traffic unlike those grazing close to a road in daylight. But without warning they burst onto the road directly in front of the car, giving me no time at all to take any safe, evasive action other than to declutch and hope.

I wonder what would have been the result if, on the wet tarmac surface, I'd either jumped on the brakes or attempted to swerve? Maybe three dead or injured bodies in the car instead of three sheep on the road

At first I thought there were two animals involved so making a snap decision (I didn't have even a penknife to put an animal out of its ceeded to Mount Pleasant.

I apologised to my passengers for the slight bump, saying that I would, if necessary divert to Fitzroy after delivering them home, and get the assistance of the Manager.

I considered this to be a civilian matter so did not call into the MPA Police Station to report the incident, but decided to wait and see what the actual damage was, then go to the Police Station in Stanley and report it there. (As people here will be aware, that road is wide enough for three vehicles to pass comfortably.) When I arrived back to the scene, about 10 to 15 minutes later. I found that the three animals had been moved to the side of the road, that there was just a large patch of blood that had spread. The actual scene was not much worse than when other such unfortunate incidents have occurred

Approaching Ponies Pass Quarry, about 10 minutes from the taxi car park, I called my shift mate on the 2 metre radio. I asked him to go and start my original car up and move it in order that I could park up, for as time was approaching chuck-out time in the bars. I needed about 5 or 10 minutes to go to the Police Station to report the accident I'd had.

The car was out with the engine running when I got there, so it was only a matter of a few minutes delay before I entered the Police Station to report the accident to the lady constable at the desk. The mobile patrol arrived approximately 10 minutes later.

I was informed that this was a serious road traffic accident and they needed to get the details and breathalyse me. It was approaching 11pm by the time the formalities were completed and I could return to work

Two days later I was asked to call into the Station to put the facts on tape for reference purposes: then a few days later I was informed that they had gone over my statement and decided that I had a case to answer, and that they were proposing that I be charged with the four charges that I ultimately faced.

I obtained the services of the solicitors, Ledingham Chalmers, who advised me to plead guilty to three offences:

1) driving without due care and attention on the Stanley - Darwin

Colliding with, and injuring sheep - (plea 'Guilty' fined £75 and licence endorsed.)

2) driving without reasonable consideration for other persons using the road.

There are only a few short stretches of tarmac surface, all the rest is loose gravel. Numerous vehicle windscreens have been shattered on these stretches. There is no law governing the flying stones being flung from the tyres of passing vehicles nor is there any signs advising the road users of the dangers of flying stones. It is always heard, when two vehicles pass, either way, the cracking of stones hitting against the side of the cars -(plea 'guilty' fined £200 and licence endorsed)

3) that I failed to report the accident to the Police within a reasonable time (withdrawn).

4) being involved in an accident whereby injury was caused to sheep, and did fail to stop and leave my name and address to any person having reasonable grounds for requiring them.

- Mount Pleasant is about an hour's drive from Stanley. There are no villages, towns or likewise along the route. (plea guilty, fined £100 and licence endorsed).

In addition, I was ordered to pay £70 costs, and given until 4pm on 1st October 2003 to pay - or

Although I accepted the solicitor's advice, I was very unhappy that I should be obliged to plead guilty to something I was perfectly innocent of and that I should have a 'black mark against my name'

In court, the Judge stated that I had driven the minibus recklessly, only thinking of myself and not for other road users.

This is totally untrue; there are those who are aware that my passengers safety comes first and foremost.

That is the reason I did not take evasive action, like swerving or jumping on the brakes on the MPA

The reason I am writing this, is to explain to your readers, just what happened on the MPA road on the 3rd August. They can then form their own conclusions.

## Historic Buildings' lease of life for Long Island Old House

THE 'Old House' at Long Island Farm, that in recent years joined the prestigious ranks of protected buildings of historic interest, has now been completely re-clad thanks to Historic Buildings Committee funding and a number of enthusiastic workers.


The farm is owned by Islanders Neil and Glenda Watson. Glenda said "...they did a splendid job in a very short time and the Old House looks great: we would like to thank the Historic Building Committee and all of the people who worked on the house, also Arthur Nutter who came along and surveyed the building to see what restoration was necessary."

The house which it is thought to have been built in the 1870's is now used as a cow shed, storage area and horse gear house.

Long Island recently became involved in the tourist industry and coach-loads of cruise ship tourists regularly visit the 'traditional working farm' during the summer season.

The Old House is an important part of the project - tourists are able to look around the historic building and view traditional Falkland Islands horse gear including traditional hide head gear and cinches (girths)

Glenda said. "The tourists are given a horse gearing demonstration outside the Old House by the corral, and then they can go in and look at our wide range of saddles including the traditional 'bastos', the wooden

framed Falkland Island saddle, old British military saddles, western saddles and Australian and Uruguayan stock saddles."

Although Neil and Glenda only purchased Long Island Farm on East Falklands in 1980, they already had an historical link - Glenda's grandparents, Rosie and Dave, began their married life in the Old House many. many years before.

The work to restore the building began some years ago after funding was awarded and the roof and south end completed by Riley Short assisted by Paul Riddell.

The flooring and west wall was a bit of a family affair when

Riley's son Richard became his able assistant.

At the end of August, Justin East, Kevin Marsh and Chris Thompson (Anyjob) arrived at Long Island to complete the east and north windows and put the chutes in place.

ers was located in the hall for on the spot refreshments, this saved thirsty dancers from having to venture outside (where it was traditional to hide drinks under the peat stack).

"Stanley had more of a western frontier town atmosphere than the sophisticated choices of entertainment enjoyed today.

"The band continued to play with great popularity in the Parish and Town Hall at dances, weddings and May Balls throughout the 1970's and on special occasions were invited to play at Government House. Travel was un-

dertaken by Beaver floatplane and MV Forrest to play at Camp events.

Robert explained that another first for the band took place after he read an advert in the 1975 edition of an Exchange & Mart magazine. It said, 'Make your own L.P record'

A recording session was organised with technician Mike Peake at the Broadcasting Station studio and a tape was made.

Robert said, "...with the lively atmosphere of the dance hall missing, an emergency supply of Scottish tonic had to be obtained to help complete the performance."

"Five hundred records arrived and no doubt there are still some copies of 'A Falkland Choice' surviving here and scattered around the world today in homes of Islanders that emigrated.

"I'm sure that on occasions they are still listened to and used at dances."

The last performance by three members of Rowlands Ragtime Band was in 1994. Surviving members, Owen Mcphee (84) and Harry Ford (77) still reside in Stanley.

Report by Debbie Summers THE beautiful Island of Pebble received a visit from an group of local tour operators last week

The group comprised myself MP Travel (Martin Beaton, Sally Dev and Sarah Clifford) and Debbie Ford for Falkland Islands

Looking forward to getting out of the office, away from Stanley/ MPA, we were all especially interested in seeing Pebble Lodge.

I last visited around six or seven years ago and remember Pebble Island as a stunningly beautiful place. The lodge itself, or Hotel as it was known then, was formerly the farm manager's house with a long and colourful history.

Allan White and Jacqui Jennings now run Pebble Lodge as their own business.

A friendly and knowledgeable young couple, they are proving their resourcefulness in meeting the challenges of a building that has lacked care and attention in recent years. They have spent the last ten weeks giving the lodge a muchneeded internal face-lift, and restoring vital services to full working

Although a desperately foggy day, before even landing we were pointing and shouting over the helicopter noise at pairs of black necked swans spotted on a pond near the settlement. We landed at the island's airstrip, conveniently located adjacent to, and overlooking, the settlement.

We received a warm welcome from Allan who drove us to the lodge where Jacqui greeted us with

cups of hot tea (Earl Grey I may add), coffee and really delicious home made cakes

As soon as we entered the building I realised that huge changes were taking place - walls formerly painted a dull hospital green throughout were now screaming with colour - sunshine yellows in the hall and stairway, lilac, deep reds, sea greens and blues in the bedrooms all with matching bed

The lodge has six twin rooms all en-suite and the bathrooms are surprisingly spacious. I particularly loved the large windows in all rooms allowing for magnificent views of the gardens, the settlement teeming with every farmyard animal imaginable, trees with redbacked hawks, turkey vultures and Falkland thrush, all just a stone's throw away

After a good look around the lodge we were itching to get out and explore. Allan offered to take us for a quick spin to the four mile long sand beach, not far from the

We drove along this awesome beach marvelling at the array of shore birds, the wonderful brown hooded gulls, kelp geese, steamer ducks and Magellanic oystercatchers, to name a few.

We parked the vehicle near a stream and took a 5-minute walk inland through rolling sand dunes to a pond where, right in front of our eyes, were two normally reticent black necked swans, a pair of rare silver teal and numerous white tufted grebes. They all obligingly swam closer to the shoreline mak-

ing sure that we got great photographs. It was an incredible sight.

Unfortunately we had to get back to the lodge as we only had a few hours on the island

Pebble Island's wildlife is legendary. In the past up to six species of penguin have been recorded. however only four are resident breeders (rockhoppers, gentoos, magellanics, and a few macaronis).

If wildlife is not your scene. Pebble Island is steeped in war history from 1982. The SAS attacked the Argentine-occupied airfield in a daring night raid. HMS Coventry was sunk 10 miles off the island's north coast.

An Argentine Learjet shot down by the Royal Navy, crashed on the island. Memorials stand on Pebble for all three. Allan's keen interest in the Falklands War comes alive when sharing these stories.

Walking can be a big part of a visit to Pebble, Will Wagstaff outlined some great walks in his recently published Bradt guide to the Falklands, available in the Lodge or in shops in Stanley. Maps are available in the Lodge if venturing out for the day on your own.

The farm itself, run by Raymond Evans and Arina Berntsen, holds many fascinations particularly for families. It is the perfect place to pet a goat, sheep, horses. ducks, hens, pigs, cats, dogs etc.. all in a completely safe environ-

Pebble Island is well loved by its inhabitants. The settlement and its animals are very well looked after. During the summer months visitors are welcome to watch sheep shearing when it is taking

Food is a subject close to my heart. I soon learned that Jacqui is growing her own herbs. Fresh eggs and meats are supplied by the farm, and a staggering array of home grown vegetables ensure that the food will be out of this world.

To sum up. Pebble Island Lodge provides the essentials for a break away from work, friendly and helpful hosts, comfortable, clean and warm surroundings, good food, wildlife on the doorstep and fantastic scenery

Repeat visitors will be pleasantly surprised by the lodge's new

Allan and Jacqui offer full and half-day guided off-road tours by Land Rover, as optional extras. There is also the option of a drop off and pick up at key wildlife spots that are a bit out of the way.

The island is 22,000 acres and 25 miles long, making it the third largest offshore island in the Falklands. It is currently inhabited by just five people, so if space and solitude is what you are after, look no further.

Pebble Lodge opens on October 1, 2003. For more information, maps and bookings contact MP Travel on 76691

Robbie said "I'm enjoying my time here at the Leisure Centre. Just like anywhere else it has its dull moments, but I try to think on the bright side. Hey I've only made two cups of tea, when Steve has made me ... three" Robbie. like myself, is in intermediate maths and has trouble counting to three - luckily he hadn't chosen the Taxation Office with Tom

Gareth Tyldsley was enjoying himself at the Design Office. He said. "I've had an excellent time at the Design Office. I chose to work here because I am hoping to get a career as an architect in later life. It was quite easy to settle in here. I knew some of the people here beforehand anyway."

The Falkland Islands Government Fisheries Department was where I found my last interviewee, Tiphanie May

She told me that working at Fisheries had been a joy and she had greatly appreciated her experiences there - including a visit to a reefer fishing vessel. Tiphanie had always wanted to be a biologist, but was unsure what aspect would suit her best. "Now," she said. "I am certain that marine biology is the perfect direction for me."

As for me, I have enjoyed every moment of my stay at Penguin News.

Before work experience I had the sole desire to be a graphic designer, but unlike some of the other pupils participating in the Work Experience programme I feel being here has had a major influence on what I wish to do in the future.



# Penguin News health

AN injury can stop your work-out progress cold, but aches and pains aren't always inevitable.

Many injuries happen because supporting muscles are either too tight or too weak

Reduce your risk by practising preventative rehabilitation with moves to guard against the most notorious exercise induced injuries.

Shinsplints

Symptoms: Pain or tenderness in the muscles attached to the shin-bone.

The triggers: A common running injury, shinsplints are often caused by too strong or tight calves, worn out shoes or doing to much too soon. Runners who overpronate (the foot rolls excessively when it strikes the ground) or who have flat arches are especially at risk.

Prehab move: Deep squatsdone in a doorway- add strength and flexibility to the lower legs and ankles.

Hold on to each side of a door frame with your arms at shoulder height. Your feet, slightly turned out, should be a little wider than shoulder-width apart, knees pointing over big toes. Squat as low as you can while your hands glide down the door frame. Keep heels flat on the floor. Hold for a count of 10, do three sets.

Shoulder Tendinitis.

Symptoms: A pinching pain at the top of the arm near the shoul-

Prevent work-out injuries

der, especially when lifting arm to the side.

The triggers: the shoulder is the most mobile joint in the body, but it is also relatively unstable, which makes it more vulnerable to injury. Overuse can stretch, pinch or tear the many ligaments or tendons around the joint.

Prehab move: Palm-up shoulder raises work the front and the middle of the deltoids without compromising the rotator cuff.

Stand holding 3 to 5 pound dumbbells at sides palms facing forward. Lock elbows and lift arms in front to shoulder height. Lower, then lift weights to sides until at shoulder level. Do 2 to 3 sets of 15 to 20 reps per move.

Torn Meniscus

Symptoms: Swelling and clicking sound in your knee.

The triggers: lunge or squat too deeply— or take too many step classes- and you may tear the meniscus, the soft disc that cushions the knee joint.

Prehab move: Strengthen the muscles that support your knee with the clock lunge.

Imagine that there is a clock on

the floor, with your feet together at the centre. Lunge forward to o'clock with your right foot, low-ering until right thigh is parallel to the floor. Return to starting position. Repeat, lunging forward and back with right foot to one, two, three, then stepping back to six o'clock. Return to start and repeat with left foot, lunging to 12, 11, 10, and nine and back to six o'clock. Try not to let your front knee extend past your toes. For an added challenge hold dumbbell. Do three sets.


Iliotibial Band (ITB) Syndrome.

Symptoms: Pain in the ITB, the thick strip of tissue that runs from the top of the hip to the outside of the knee.

The triggers: tight muscles and ligaments in the hip can pull the knee joint out of alignment, creating inflammation in the affected hip, knee or ITB. Overuse while running, stair climbing or doing various other aerobic activity can bring it on.

Prehab move. Hip stretches increase flexibility in the muscles around the hip joint, reducing your risk of injury in surrounding tendons. Stand with right foot crossed over left, knees slightly bent.

Lean right while pushing left hip out to the side, feeling the stretch along your left hip. Hold for 15 second, switch sides and repeat.

# Recipes for the Falkland Islands

Bread Pudding with Whisky Sauce

#### Ingredients

2 eggs, beaten
40g butter, melted
30ml vanilla extract
590ml milk
50g white sugar
0.5kg French bread or similar cut
into inch cubes
120g chopped pecans

#### Sauce

100g white sugar 115g butter 120ml heavy cream 60ml whisky

#### Directions

Preheat oven to 325 F (165 C). Lightly grease a 9 x 13 inch pan. In a large bowl, stir together eggs, butter, vanilla and milk. Gradually add sugar and mix thoroughly until dissolved. Place bread cubes in bottom of the prepared pan. Pour liquid over bread, fully saturating all the bread. Sprinkle pecans on top.

Bake in preheated oven for 60 minutes until golden.

Meanwhile combine white sugar, butter, cream and whisky (sauce ingredients) in a small saucepan.

Warm over low heat, stirring constantly, until sauce is gently boiling.

## Wool market report for week ending September 19 by Neil Judd, Wool Advisor, Department of Agriculture

#### General Overview

GREASY wool prices in New Zealand and Australia generally fell at the fine end, but remained quite firm at the broader end of the micron spectrum.

The main international excep-tion to this trend was South Africa, where all prices increased by several percent.

Analysts in South Africa reported that the increases brought the local wool markets back into line with greasy wool prices in Australia.

It is worthy of note that the latest information on the state of the Australian wool industry (Australian Wool Innovation) predicts another very large decline in the Australian wool clip.

Australian shorn-wool production is predicted to decline by a further 10% to 440 million greasy kilograms during the 2003 / 2004 shearing season.

Much of the forecast decline in production is being attributed to the continuation of drought conditions in the major sheep and wool producing areas of NSW and QLD.

Limited global wool supply and

potential for improved wool demand in some markets, are providing reasons for optimism in the minds of some industry analysts about price prospects for greasy wool in the upcoming months, particularly for high quality well prepared wool.

#### **British Quotations for Tops**

British top quotations reflected the greasy wool markets of the world, with quotations down at the finer end of the market and quite firm for the broader top quotations.

#### Australian Market

In total 51,550 bales of wool were offered for sale during the week, with 41,142 bales purchased by the trade. Pass in rate averaged

Included in the offering were 3,036 bales of crossbred wool, of which 2,580 bales were sold. (pass in rate 15.0%).

#### Auctions next week.

67,000 bales are rostered for sale in Australia, 7,000 bales in South Africa and a sale in New Zealand.

# Argentina begins talks with private creditors

ARGENTINA proposed this Monday in Dubai a restructuring of its foreign debt of 94,3 billion US dollars that includes an average write off equivalent to 75% of the face value of defaulted bonds.

As had been announced and taking advantage of the annual IMF-World Bank annual assembly, Economy Minister Roberto Lavagna addressed Argentine defaulted bond holders' representatives and offered three main options: discount, par and capitalization "C" bonds linked to Argentina's economic growth.

Discount bonds will suffer a nominal 75% write off and par bonds will keep face value but have longer maturing dates and lower rates.

The 94.3 billion US dollars represents 52.7% of Argentina's sovereign international liabilities with the private sector. Officials estimate Argentine residents are holders of half that amount that is made up of 152 different bond issues with arbitration in eight countries.

Finance Secretary Guillermo Nielsen added that the three basic restructured bonds will also contemplate a mix of further options with fixed and linked rates.

"We want to share the benefits of a faster medium term growth, with interest rates that contemplate the situation in the event of a slowing down or fall of the economy." said Mr. Nielsen emphasizing that Argentina will offer "a whole family of bonds to satisfy the different holders."

Mr. Lavagna indicated that Argentina would be the global coordinator of the operation but will invite twelve leading banks in emerging markets to syndicate for the exchange process. Bonds will be

issued in US dollars, Euros, Japanese yens and indexed Argentine pesos.

The defaulted bonds restructure is closely linked to the recent three years 21 billion US dollars accord reached with the IMF to refinance and limit repayments to multilateral organizations such as the IMF. World Bank and Interamerican Development Bank. "extending until 2013 and 2018."

"This point is not included in the current letter of intent that expires in 2006, but conversations have begun," said Mr. Nielsen, According to the agreement with the IMF Argentina must achieve a 3% of GDP primary budget surplus in 2004 with the purpose of addressing creditors.

Mr. Lavagna stressed that the main burden of the restructuring bond negotiations will fall on Argentine residents who hold 34% of the defaulted papers and revealed that the 3% surplus estimated for 2005 and 2006 is the floor "and could increase depending on economic growth and a reduction in unemployment and poverty."

Mr. Nielsen added that if Argentina was to pay debt interests in 2004 according to the original agenda "it would have needed an 8% primary surplus budget."

The press in Dubai described the reactions of defaulted bond holders' representatives as "diverse and angry." Foreign creditors are organized in four consulting groups operating from New York, Italy, Germany and Japan.

In Buenos Aires financial markets Argentina's country risk index jumped to over 5,100 points, the bond market lost ground but the Argentine peso remained stable at 2.93 to the US dollar.

## Chilean peso strong against dollar

THE United States dollar continued to slide in Chile's financial markets and this Monday reached 657 Chilean pesos, its lowest level since June 2002.

So far this year the US dollar has lost 6% of its value against the Chilean peso.

Santiago market analysts believe the strong showing of the Chilean economy that is scheduled to expand close to 4% this year and good prospects for the country's exports have had a positive influence in the appreciation of the local currency.

A strong peso is good news for Chileans planning to travel overseas, particularly Argentina and Brazil, but not so encouraging for incoming tourists. In the height of the Brazilian financial crisis the US dollar exchange rate reached 750 Chilean pesos.

## Arg-Chile border integration

ARGENTINE Ambassador in Chile, Carlos Abihaggle said Argentina will "invest heavily" to improve frontier passes and facilitate the circulation of residents from both countries.

The "integrated border system" is geared to make effective the free circulation of Chilean and Argentine residents beginning next January, as was recently agreed between presidents Nestor Kirchner and Ricardo Lagos indicated Mr. Abihaggle during a short visit to Rio Gallegos.

"President (Nestor) Kirchner and Foreign Secretary Rafael Bielsa have underlined the need to federalize Argentine and Chilean policies. We need to build an enduring relation, beneficial for both sides. A strategic alliance based on the strong understanding between both presidents," said Mr. Abihaggle who this week will be participating in the regional bi-national "Frontier Passes" summit to be held in Punta Arenas.

The Argentine-Chile Frontier

Committee meets regularly with the participation of Foreign Secretaries, the Patagonian regional governments (Tierra del Fuego. Santa Cruz and Magallanes Region) and military officers responsible for the custody of border passes.

"Our goal is to ensure citizens from both countries can circulate by simply showing their IDs with no need for any paperwork." added Mr. Abihaggle.

The new border integrated system should make traffic more agile, facilitate transport of goods, tourism, and will also help to control across border car robberies.

Apparently the Argentine government is planning to invest over two million US dollars in the Austral Integration Pass of Mount Aymond, forty miles south of Río Gallegos.

"Funds have also been allocated for the Jama Pass in Jujuy (north Argentina) and for the Cristo Redentor and Pehuenches passes in Mendoza," said Ambassador Abihaggle.

## Punta Arenas - three shoplifters per day

THREE shoplifters are detained daily on average in Punta Arenas supermarkets according to the latest judicial statistics.

Local press indicates that since the introduction of a new German inspired prosecution code, crime statistics are more accurate in Punta Arenas and in the case of supermarkets, shoplifters target high value produce, alcohol, fancy packaged goods and the latest toys such as "Bay blade."

The increase in crime has forced supermarkets to improve security and surveillance systems plus adopt other "intelligent" resources for high valued products such as individual alarms or simply having the empty boxes in shelves.

However the judicial report also points out that there's still a "grey number" of crimes committed that go unreported since some victims are distrustful of the police and judicial system.

This usually happens when cars, either stationed or when waiting for traffic lights, are broken into or even when women in the streets suffer the snatching of bags or

purses mainly by minors.

With this in mind Punta Arenas municipal authorities have installed a first vigilance high resolution video camera that covers the main square of the city with a backup computer system that stores the filming for a month.

The experimental camera system is expected to be increased in the coming weeks, (no location places have been anticipated besides the fact they will be in downtown) and ready for an official inauguration during November. Apparently the local council approved the equivalent of 20.000 US dollars for the operation back in 2001.

"I think the delay has helped reduce costs since we now have a better technical solution with improved range and excellent resolution," said Councillor Jose Saldivia.

Punta Arenas mayor added that "we are even thinking on mobile cameras since wireless technology is now available, besides the fact that we want to add a cam system so the world can see on Internet how Punta Arenas is improving all the time."

## Thirty cases of Hepatitis A by end 2003

THE number of hepatitis A cases in Punta Arenas is expected to be over thirty by the end of 2003, according to Eduardo Velázquez, Officer of the Epidemiology and Statistics Health Service of Magallanes Region.

So far 18 cases have been clearly

identified, the majority of which related to an outbreak in a very modest home in one of Punta Arenas shanty towns. Similarly most cases are among children in school age, from homes without running water or sewage, and families that have insufficient sanitary education.
