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Illex collapse hits budget

COUNCILLORS are assessing the financial implications appalling illex squid catches will have on the government's budget.

Chairman of Standing Finance Committee Councillor Mike Summers yesterday confirmed that, following the lowest catches on record, the illex season will have to close early

This, he said, will require the Falkland Islands Government to make, "...substantial refunds of licence fees (or where they have not been paid that income will not now accrue)."

Taking into account other related activity to the illex fishery, Councillor Summers said the government believes income this year will be near to £10 million less than anticipated.

He said this "clearly affects" the budget process, "... because there will now be a substantial deficit on this year's accounts.

"There are few opportunities to reduce expenditure in the rest of this financial year."

Councillor Summers said judgements will have to be made on what level of licence fee can be charged for illex next year: "...given the results of the last three years it is likely to be substantially less than in past years - perhaps a reduction of around £5 million on the normal figure.

"Whilst we have substantial reserves which we can draw on in the short term, we cannot continue to use them up year on year, so we will have to take steps to reduce expenditure on a progressive basis until we get back to a balanced budget."

Following examination last week of departmental budget submissions, councillors have asked senior government officers (Chief Executive, Financial Secretary). Deputy Financial Secretary) to, "... come to us in about two weeks with some further proposals to reduce operating expenditure and capital/transfer costs by a further 5%."

Councillor Summers said this will be easier to achieve in some areas than others, "but inevitably it will result in reductions in service levels

Regarding any possible impact on the health and education services, he said. "We will look at the whole package of proposals before coming to any firm decisions on any of them.

"We will make every effort to

maintain education and medical services at current levels, but this might not be achievable in all areas; however there is no threat to mainstream education and health service provision."

Councillor Summers believes the current challenges to the budget will not be a one year process and planning for the future is vital.

He said, "Even if illex were to return in profusion next year, licence income would in all likelihood not be proportionate, and in any event after two bad years in three we have to be conscious that there could be a new pattern of ocean current change, and less reliability.

"We must therefore plan to re-

"We must therefore plan to reduce expenditure on a measured basis, taking care all the time not to damage the private sector economy and public confidence in the future."

Councillor Summers added, "There is a positive future for the Falklands economy, but we require some adjustment to public expectation and consequently expenditure levels which we would hope to achieve over the next three or four years."

News in brief

Belt up in future

IT WILL soon become compulsory for children to be strapped in when travelling in motor vehicles - and adults travelling outside Stanley will have to buckle up too.

Executive Council agreed to a change to the law governing the use of seatbelts at its meeting last week. This will make the wearing of seatbelts or child restraints compulsory for children being carried as passengers in motor vehicles.

It will also ensure that adults will be required to wear seatbelts on all designated roads with speed limits in excess of 25 miles per hour.

Meetings postponed

THREE committee meetings have had to be rescheduled in the past two weeks, after they were found to be in violation of the government's access to information rules.

A Public Works Meeting held on Wednesday, March 24, was declared invalid as agendas for the meetings were not made available to the public three working days in advance of the meeting.

Meetings of the Falklands Landholdings Corporation and the Falkland Islands Development Board had to be postponed from March 30 to April 20 for the same reason.

Governor meets the Queen

HIS Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce, has had an official audience with the Queen.

Mr Pearce had his post as Governor officially confirmed by Her Majesty in an audience at Buckingham Palace on Tuesday.

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Almirante Irizar was 'in Argentine waters'

ARGENTINE press reports say the naval icebreaker Almirante Irizar which sailed through the Falklands Outer Conservation Zone and the Falklands Interim Conservation Zone last month was, "...carrying out fishing-control operations in Argentine waters."

On March 15 the icebreaker and one of its Sea King helicopters challenged by radio a number of vessels fishing in the Falklands zone.

On Tuesday, the website of Argentine newspaper, La Nacion quoted a Foreign Affairs Ministry official as saying, "The Irizar was engaged in fishing-control operations in waters under Argentine jurisdiction, including the fishing prohibition zone and the area west of this zone, as agreed with the United Kingdom in 1989 and 1990.

"During its voyage the ship was in contact for security purposes with British ships, in accordance with

maritime rules and customs.
"Given the lack of squid in this season, the Argentine government has taken great precautions to protect fish species, which includes control of illegal fishing."

MANY eyes must have rolled skyward over the scheduling and rescheduling of government committees that has gone on during the past couple of weeks. The law says agendas must be issued to the public at least three working

days prior to meetings - it's a clear and simple rule.

However on three occasions in the past formight this hasn't happened and meetings have had to be rescheduled. It's not entirely unexpected - as the government works towards being more open, it will have these small hiccups

along the way.

However, I had to laugh when I heard the March 24 meeting of the Public Works Committee, which lasted over two hours, had been declared invalid.

Before commencing business the Committee discussed the fact the agenda had only been publicly released a matter of hours earlier but still opted to go ahead with their meeting.

As a result all business was declared void and the committee now has to As a result all business was declared void and the committee now has to have the meeting again. The entire meeting - same agenda, same decisions, same everything. It's not exactly an efficient use of time is it? Both government and private sector representatives sit on the panel and I'm sure they all have busy jobs to do.

But, then again, time wasting isn't really the issue. It's the fact that, despite acknowledging the fact the agenda was not in the public domain for long enough before the meeting, the Chairman opted to go ahead with it all

the same. It was a blatant neglect of the rules.

Open government doesn't have to be difficult; there will of course be teething problems as everyone gets used to the obligations the notion car-

I hope the authorities have learned their lesson at Councillor Roger's expense: throwing caution to the wind and bending the rules of openness will cost you, both time and integrity.

PRAISE be for one of the most sensible decisions to be taken by Executive Council this year - to make the use of child restraints and seatbelts compul-

After growing up with a paediatric nurse for a mother. I am all too aware of the kind of damage that can be done to a child when it travels through a windscreen - even at speeds as low as 20 miles an hour.

If this law protects just one child, it's worth it.

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Minister's whirlwind tour

AFTER a whirlwind visit, the Minister of State for Defence Procurement, Lord Bach of Lutterworth, left the Islands "most impressed" by the defence measures in force.

He arrived in the Islands on Friday. March 26, for two intense days of visits to Stanley, Mount Pleasant (MPA), San Carlos and Darwin

During his visit he met with councillors and military personnel from both MPA and the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF).

Shortly after his arrival, Lord Bach arrived in Stanley by helicopter where the FIDF, under Major Peter Biggs, demonstrated the range and quality of their equipment and

weapon skills.

The Minister later held discussions with councillors, before attending a reception in Government House where he met a number of Falklands residents.

After discussions with the Commander of British Forces and his staff on Saturday morning. Lord Bach toured MPA during which he saw the

full spectrum of military capability available. A military spokesperson said. "From inside the cockpit of a Tornado F3. Lord Bach heard about the capabilities of the aircraft and its role within the Falkland Islands.

"He watched closely as fictional enemy were captured and led away and at Mare Harbour, he was briefed on the workings of one of only two, solely military ports still in exist-

Before his departure on Saturday afternoon, Lord Bach paid his respects to the servicemen who gave their lives during the Falklands War at the British cemetery at San Carlos: he then viewed the work underway on the Argentine memorial at Dar-

Air Commodore Richard Lacey Commander of British Forces said the visit had been a great success

Lord Bach was very keen to see the level of capability we have here and to learn of our experiences with the equipment, the purchase of which his department is responsible for

Road accident ignored

A MAN involved in a single vehicle accident last month watched in disbelief as several vehicles drove past him without stopping.

John Lee had been travelling from his home at Goose Green to Stanley on March 18, as passenger in a Mitsubishi minibus driven by Bonita Greenland.

The vehicle left the road just before Bluff Cove leaving Mrs Greenland trapped in the vehicle; Mr Lee was able to get out of the overturned vehicle and tried to free Mrs Greenland, however he said, "...I couldn't hold her up and get her legs out by myself."

He attempted to attract the attention of other road users from beside the vehicle in the ditch, however Mr Lee said three vehicles passed by without stopping.

Help finally arrived when Stanley resident Justin East came across the vehicle, stopped, and assisted Mr Lee in helping Mrs Greenland out of the vehicle. Ian and Eileen Jaffray from North Arm then drove Mr Lee and

Mrs Greenland to the hospital in Stanley.

Mr Lee said he felt angry that the three drivers had not stopped; he said if they had not seen him waving, they must at least have seen the vehicle in the ditch

He said he felt the right thing to do when someone comes across an accident is, "...check there is nobody inside."

Inspector Len McGill said, "...it is always good citizenship to go to other people's assistance."

He advised road users to contact the police on the emergency radio frequencies published in the information pull-out of *Penguin News* should they come across an accident.

He said he would prefer to "...receive three reports on the same accident than not have it reported at all, resulting in someone not receiving immediate attention."

Mrs Greenland said she would like to send her sincere thanks to those who did stop to help her and Mr Lee at the time of the accident.

A NEW computer qualification has had its first three passes in the Falklands.

Roxanne King, Ray Stevenson (Ministry of Defence) and Emily Sanders have completed all seven module examinations for European Computer Driving Licence qualification.

British Computer Society Examiner Val Padgett said candidates have 45 minutes to complete the on-line module exam. "The exams are particularly good because they emulate the practical use of computers in an office environment." She said the candidates' log books will now be sent to the UK for certification and the British Computer Society will then issue the examination certificate.

Emily Sanders, 17, explained the work she did to get the European Computer Driving Licence: "There are seven different modules to take, including spreadsheets, databases, and internet and email. It covers the

usual computer programmes (Excel, Word, Outlook Express, etc).

"I bought a CD-ROM from the training centre to begin with. This teaches you everything you need to know for each module, from the very basics, to the more complicated stuff.

"It gives you a number of tests to take for each module, and advises you when you are ready to take the actual module."

She said she felt the main benefit of having the qualification would be, "...that it is recognised throughout the whole of Europe (not just the IJK)

"I wanted to do it because I wasn't working every day, and wanted to have something to show for the nine months between school and college."

Argentina has 'overstepped the mark'

DESPITE Argentine press reports to the contrary, Falklands Councillor Stephen Luxton says no official statement has been received regarding the incursion by the *Almirante Irizar*.

He commented yesterday, "As far as the Argentine spokesperson's statement is concerned, it is the sort of arrogant and entirely incorrect statement one might expect from Argentina, which serves only to reinforce our absolute desire to maintain British sovereignty."

In a written ministerial statement released on Friday, March 26, Mr Rammell said, "We asked the Argentine government for an explanation of the vessel's actions. Their response was not satisfactory.

"We have therefore made a formal protest to the Argentine government concerning the actions of the Almirante Irizar, underlining the need to ensure that this type of incident does not happen again."

This note also reiterated that


Her Majesty's Government has no doubts about UK sovereignty over the Falkland Islands."

Mr Rammell confirmed he had spoken to Falklands councillors about the incident. He said, "I share their concerns and I have briefed them on our response. I assured them of our continued firm support."

Councillor Luxton said he and his colleagues are, "...very happy with the approach taken by the British government in general, Foreign and Commonwealth Office and Mr Rammell in particular; they are all very supportive of our position."

Councillor Luxton explained that a formal protest is, "...formal recognition that an illegal act has been performed. It's not something that is done lightly. It only happens when something of international significance takes place."

He said he believes Argentina realises, "...they've overstepped the mark - this formal protest indicates they've gone too far."



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Mount Pleasant retains South Atlantic Ashes

THE prestigious South Atlantic Ashes remain at Mount Pleasant, after military cricketers once again beat their civilian rivals.

The challenge was issued by the Falkland Islands Cricket Association, following their recent and successful tour to Chile.

After three years of military possession, they felt the time had come to win back the South Atlantic Ashes trophy and the Mount Pleasant team welcomed the opportunity to compete, once again, on the cricket pitch.

The tension increased as overnight rain and overcast weather dashed hopes of a game on Saturday, March 20 but, despite both teams therefore being robbed of some of their first choice players, the game was set for the following Sunday afternoon.

The Falklands team won the

toss and elected to bat but were soon in some trouble against the opening attack.

Wickets fell steadily in the first ten overs and soon the team found themselves staring down the barrel at 26 for 4 after 13 overs with Reeves, Woodhouse, Rocke and Marlor all dismissed cheaply.

However, subsequent bowlers for Mount Pleasant had some difficulty finding their line in the stiffening breeze and this, combined with some staunch defence by Harte, Ferguson and Doyle, allowed the Falklands team to stage a recovery.

By the 30th over they had progressed to 80 for 7.

This mini-recovery forced the military captain to bring back his opening bowlers and the run rate soon dried up with the Falklands finally being bowled out for a total

of 83 in 33.2 overs; a higher score than had looked likely earlier in the

For Mount Pleasant. Law and Smith were the pick of the bowlers with figures of 7.2-2-8-2 and 8-1-17-3 respectively.

After a short break the Falklands team took their turn in the field and Mount Pleasant set about chasing the target.

A steady start saw Mount Pleasant gain 17 runs before the loss of Hughes in the third over.

This brought Philips to the wicket and a rapid fire 13 runs from him saw his team well placed at 31 for one in the seventh over before he mis-cued a pull shot and was well caught on the square-leg boundary.

Mount Pleasant captain, Guy Lendon said, "Both fell to the lively Marlor who continued to pose questions to the batsmen all afternoon "

Lendon took over from Philips and after a slow start he and Machin warmed to the task in hand and reached the required total without further loss in the seventeenth over: Lendon gained top score with 31 with Machin not far behind on 25

Thus Mount Pleasant retained the South Atlantic Ashes for the fourth year in a row after a wellcontested and very friendly game.

After the match, Squadron Leader Lendon commented, "Congratulations and thanks must go to all who took part, including the ladies who assisted with scoring, for an entertaining day of sport.

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Court news

Drunken joyride proves costly for seamen

TWO seamen were ordered to pay up after they took a drunken joy ride on an excavator.

Able Seamen John McGowan and Timothy Patterson of the research ship *Ernest Shackleton* pleaded guilty to charges in connection with unlawfully taking the excavator.

The two came across the digger on a grass verge opposite the Narrows Bar when returning to their hotel in Stanley after a party on the Shackleton in the early hours of Friday, March 26.

Prosecutor Graham Cripps said Mr McGowan hopped in the vehicle and, seeing the key was in the ignition, started the digger. His friend joined him in the vehicle and the two drove around in circles on the verge until, "_Mr Patterson sat on the digger's emergency stop button and the vehicle came to a halt."

The men were arrested and taken to the police station. Mr

McGowan was breathalysed and gave a reading of 51mg per 100ml of breath analysed. The legal limit is 35mg.

Mr Cripps said the two men fully admitted their actions to police and apologised for what Mr McGowan described as, "...a stupid thing to do."

The Senior Magistrate Nick Sanders told Mr McGowan that if he had driven on the road he would have faced a custodial sentence.

However he said he was satisfied it was, "an act of stupidity," and the two had no sinister motive.

For taking the vehicle without consent and driving it without a licence or insurance after consuming excess alcohol, Mr McGowan was fined a total of £700. For allowing himself to be carried in a stolen vehicle. Mr Patterson was fined £150.

Both men were ordered to pay prosecution costs of £70.

Foreign Office: thumbs up for wildlife

THE Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) has lent its support to a Falklands environmental charity.

As part of its Overseas Territories Programme, the FCO has awarded £150,000 over the next two financial years to Falklands Conservation's Albatross and Petrel Conservation Programme.

In addition, the Falkland Islands Government has donated £50,000 to the programme.

Conservation Officer, Becky Ingham explained that the programme continues the work done by the FC Seabirds at Sea Team over recent years.

She said, "The emphasis will be on monitoring breeding sites and the threats these birds are open to while breeding, such as fire, pests, disturbance and disease introduction."

She said the programme will focus on six sites in the Falkland Islands. "...to develop action plans for and work with the landowners, tourists, farmers and anyone else who uses the area, to create best-practice working examples of management."

Miss Ingham said the funds from the FCO and government will also go towards, "... a complete census of albatross, southern giant petrel and white chinned petrel - and establishing ringing and long term monitoring of population size and trends."

She said the fact the FCO has awarded this money to Falklands Conservation is very important: "It is a real thumbs up they are giving the Falklands, the albatross and the environment."

She said with the government's

announcement it is adopting a National Plan of Action on Seabirds, "...the timing is just brilliant."

From April 14, 2004, regular meetings will be held where all members of Falklands Conservation (FC) are invited to attend and join the discussions on key issues affecting the Falklands environment.

These members' evenings will include a talk by visiting researchers or staff, followed by an open debate

For the first evening, the talk will be led by Dr Ben Sullivan around FC's work with the fishing industry and the central topics open for discussion will be egging and the Cape Pembroke area.

Conservation Officer Becky Ingham said, "We are hoping that by asking people for their opinions on some fairly emotive issues, we can find out exactly what our membership wants FC to do.

"At present, we are largely guided by research and personal opinions, and whilst that is fine in certain circumstances, there are issues which have big impacts on local people and their way of life, and we want to make sure that we are reacting, as an organisation, in a way that reflects the feelings of the members of FC."

Magistrate: all criminal offences must be declared

TWO CASES of giving false information to an Immigration Officer were heard in the Magistrates Court on Wednesday.

Alan George Lunn (23) and Robert Welsh (29), employees of Turners at Mount Pleasant both entered pleas of guilty to the charge

In both cases criminal record checks had been run by the Royal Falkland Island Police during investigations into unrelated matters.

Mr Lunn said he believed that he did not have to declare the convictions as they were juvenile convictions and were considered spent.

Mr Welsh also said he, "...genu-

inely thought after so many years, the offences were no longer on record." Mr Welsh had been convicted of assault and breach of the peace in 1992 and 1993.

Senior Magistrate Nick Sanders gave both men full credit for their early guilty pleas but stressed that the question on the immigration form was specific in asking if you have ever been convicted of any criminal offences, spent or otherwise, adding, "This is a matter which the Falkland Islands take very seriously."

Both men were fined £150 plus prosecution costs of £70.

Watson's years of resistance

1 SEE my good friend Neil Watson had a letter in last week's Penguin News and I am not surprised.

For the record, Neil is on the wrong side of sixty, he can never remember a time in his life when the Argentines did not lay claim to his homeland.

In 1964 he was on the scene when a light aircraft landed and stuck Argentine flags in the ground.

Again in 1966 when a larger Argentine plane with a bunch of armed men (and a woman) landed on the racecourse, they had come to take over the Falklands. Watson was there again, this time armed and dangerous. After a two day stand off during which time the Argies took the then Chief of Police and several Royal Marines captive, the Argies surrendered.

After several years in the Falkland Islands Defence Force. (FIDF) Neil moved to Long Island. A couple of days after the Argentine invasion in 1982, Neil came into town to pick up his children who were living in Stanley; he was possibly the first Falkland Islander to be arrested by the Argentines when he refused to stop his vehicle so they could photograph him. He was dragged into the Town Hall and, after a harrowing couple of hours, released; but by this time his card was marked

A few days later six marines who had escaped during the initial Argentine attack turned up at Long Island. Neil and his wife Glenda sheltered and fed these guys although they knew the Argentines were searching for them.

Eventually the Marines themselves decided to turn themselves in as prisoners of war but not before, with Neil's assistance, they buried all their arms and ammunition. Neil then informed the Argentines that the Marines had just arrived at his farm and wished to surrender.

The helicopter that arrived at Long Island to take the Royal Marines prisoner contained not only twenty-odd heavily armed soldiers but also the notorious Major Dowling - notorious for being involved in the 'disappearance' of his own countrymen during the so called 'dirty war' in Argentina.

After arresting the Royal Marines. Dowling then kicked in the door of the Watsons house, stuck a pistol under Neil's chin and threatened to shoot him then and there in front of his wife and children; enough for one family you might think, not enough for the Watsons.

When the British troops arrived at Mount Kent, Neil was there again with his vehicle, this time helping to move ammunition and troops into forward positions for the attack on Mount Longdon. During this time the Argentines were shelling the British positions.

But this is enough from me, if anyone out there thinks that Watson may have an attitude problem I suggest they contact him directly. Laurie Butler

Reward for return of missing lamb

DURING the early hours of Wednesday, March 24, we believe someone took it upon themselves to steal a four month old pet lamb from our back yard at 45 Callaghan Road.

This lamb was one of two pets belonging to our children Rachel and Kenton. In spite of our efforts to date, there has been no sight or sound of our missing pet.

We feel sure now that those responsible had one motive in mind to eat this animal.

Not only is it a very selfish act towards our innocent children, who faithfully fed it from birth, it was also a very stupid thing to do.

What the thief or thieves did not know, was that these pets were re-cently drenched with two sheep drenches, one called Southern Mineral Mix and the other called Nilverm.

It states on the containers of both products that any animal receiving these drugs should not be

slaughtered for human consumption for at least 90 days after administering. These lambs were drenched just two weeks ago.

Anyone eating such meat could be at risk from severe long term damage. So be warned, if you are the person who took the lamb, just what you may be letting yourself or your children into.

I would think very carefully about eating it. You should seek medical or veterinary advice if you have.

We continue to hope that this lamb might be returned to us and as such we are offering a reward of £50 to the person who has information that can lead to the recovery or the known whereabouts of this pet. U-turn in strict planning laws

WHY was one of the foundations on the new sheltered housing site on John Street/Villiers Street allowed to remain in position when it was discovered that it was just thirty centimetres away from the Lady Hunt School Hostel? And that's before even a roof goes on the final struc-

Not only is this a potential fire safety hazard but it does not take into account that the hostel is in fact home to many young children. Does this not put these residents at risk? Surely this is also in contradiction to the very strict planning laws that are in force in the Islands. Is this a u-turn for the strict planning laws?

I understand that under the current building and planning conditions. dwellings must not be closer than at least five metres from an existing public road or foot path and 2 meters away from any neighbouring dwelling or structure.

This foundation is a mere thirty centimetres from the hostel and is barely two metres from the public

foot path.

A councillor has already admitted to such an oversight, will he be answerable for this error, or will FIG leave this site as it is because someone from the Planning Office has advised that FIG can in fact build a dwelling any distance it so desires from another FIG property?

Do the planning laws actually agree with this statement?

Does this also mean that private builders will now also have the same right to erect dwellings in very close proximity to their current dwellings an example might be on a farm?

I find it so hard to grasp that so many dwellings have to be squashed into ever decreasing plot sizes within the town, when there is an abundance of good building areas all around the outer area of the town that could be developed

I am sure that if this was the work of a private builder, they would have been required to dig it up and relo-cate it to the specified distance as laid down in the planning laws.

FIG and the councillors should be reminded that the health and safety of the residents of the school hostel and the new tenants of the sheltered homes is likely to be undermined. Both houseparents flats will be like living in a dungeon when the construction is complete and will result in these occupants consuming larger amounts of electricity to light their

This is by no means the fault of the construction company, but of the government and councillors who failed to correctly review this site before development began.

Were the families of those children who live in the hostel made fully aware of the situation? Maybe no one could be bothered to tell them.

Building does meet safety requirements

IN RESPONSE to the letter from Robin Goodwin I have the following comments.

The foundation for the sheltered unit adjacent to John Street is being constructed according to the approved plans and is acceptable both in planning and building control

As originally shown the roof for this unit was to extend beyond the gable ends. At the eastern end this would have taken it into the hostel building. This is easily remedied by making the roof end flush with the gable and a variation in the planning consent has been agreed accordingly. Such amendments are not unusual, being a standard way of dealing with issues arising on site

Fire safety is always a concern. This is primarily assessed via the Building Regulations 1999. This sets minimum standards that all developments requiring a building permit must meet. This development meets these standards.

Of course more can always be done, and an important part of the Building Adviser's role is to offer advice to developers on where they may wish to improve on the minimum standards. Interestingly though the pressure from the community over the last year or so has been to relax standards and legislation to allow building permit relaxations in appropriate circumstances is now

being progressed. In this case, although not required by the Building Regulations, increased fire protection to the walls of the south west corner of Lady Hunt House has been agreed by the Planning and Building Committee in response to concerns being voiced from members of the public

At all stages of the process it has been recognised this unit is close to another building, also in government ownership, namely Lady Hunt House. The requirement for separation, under the Building Regulations, relates only to boundaries between land in different ownership.

The distances to which Mr Goodwin refers relate to planning guidelines for residential plots. These were not specifically designed to cover larger scale development sites such as this. It must also be stressed that planning applications are always considered on their planning merits and guidelines are just one aspect (legislation and policy are others) which influence their determination

Regarding public consultation on the development, this was fully dealt with by the planning process. Applications for both the outline and detailed development of the site were advertised through the usual monthly Notice of Planning Applications received

The site was selected by Councillors indicating a wish to see sheltered housing within Stanley town centre and followed objection to development within the actual grounds of Stanley House

Reference is also made to 'an abundance of good building areas all around the outer area of the Town. Whilst I would agree there is no apparent shortage of land around Stanley its development requires careful forward planning, in particular co-ordination with provision of new service infrastructure. This is addressed in the recently adopted Stanley Town Plan.

Finally the Environmental Planning Department is always pleased to respond to any specific queries or concerns that a developer or con-

'Penguin News and FIBS are vital to the Falklands'

LIFE in the Falklands would be worse off without *Penguin News* and the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station (FIBS), Media Consultant David Scott (right) believes.

Mr Scott was in the Islands last week, charged with the task of examining the present role of the Media Trust and looking to its future, particularly in relation to FIBS and

Penguin News

Former editor of various newspapers in the United Kingdom, David was managing director of Midlands newspaper group before establishing his own consultancy and training company sixteen years ago He advises various newspaper groups in the UK on their strategy and guides government and private organisations on how to handle the media.

Editor of *Penguin News* Jenny Cockwell (JC) met with Mr Scott (DS) on the eve of his departure to talk about his progress with the Media Trust.

JC: You have visited the Falkland Islands twice previously. How important do you believe the roles of *Penguin News* and the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station (FIBS) are to the Islands?

DS: Penguin News and FIBS are an important part of community life here in the Falklands and the question is now whether we can build on the rock that exists and improve quality in order to give readers and listeners a first class service.

People might moan and groan at times, but life in the Falklands would be worse off if *Penguin News* and FIBS weren't around.

It is easy to take something for granted, but it is not until it is removed that people really understand what they had. People ought to value what they've got in *Penguin News* and FIBS and play their part. I detect that people understand this deep down and they are prepared to support what's going to go on.

JC: What exactly was your remit for this, your third visit to the Falklands?

DS: The remit this week was to review the progress of *Pengutn News* and to advise the Media Trust on opportunities for the future and to give them some guidance - they are a new body - and to also look at FIBS and any other allied operation that the Media Trust wanted me to review.

Dick Sawle, chairman of the Media Trust, has been in situ for a number of months, he felt he needed some outside advice and we talked over e-mail in November and December and agreed a programme for a visit.

JC: Who did you meet with over the past week?

DS: 1 met with members of the public, staff of *Penguin News* and FIBS, councillors, the Acting Governor, Chief Executive, Attorney General - right across the spectrum.

I was involved in a public meeting, a radio phone in and I had a few meetings with private individuals; I just let it be known that I was here and it was up to people to decide if they wanted to talk to me. JC: What impressions have you formed as a result of this consultation?

DS: A number of things have emerged. There seems to be some sort of consensus emerging in the Falklands that there is a window of opportunity now.

Penguin News has matured - in the six years since I first came here the newspaper has changed: it has vastly improved. It is covering more news, it is certainly well read and has a high standing both within the Falklands and abroad.

In talking to people, there seems now to be an understanding that the situation that has operated at *Penguin News* for a number of years, in that it comes under the control and management of the Media Trust and has had nothing to do with the government (although in the past it has had a government subsidy), needs now to be considered as the way forward for FIBS.

What I've been looking at now, and will continue to look at back in England, is whether it is practical and how to achieve it.

JC: How do you think this set up would work with FIBS being managed by the Media Trust? Why do you think it would be a good move?

DS: The meeting with councillors on Monday seemed to indicate that they want us to consider this and move it forward - I think they can see the advantages of divorce while still leaving certain guarantees with regard to subsidy, equipment and other things. There has been a maturity displayed in all the discussions I have had that this is the right move, the time is now right.

I think anyone connected with the radio station and the newspaper will be quite open and say that government has not interfered with their operations - they've been strong in their criticisms at times and voice those criticisms, but they've not tried to interfere with the editorial content.

However there has been a public perception, particularly with the radio station in recent years, that they could interfere if they so wished, even though this hasn't been done. I think the government is being sensible in saying. "Let's really kill this one off and place FIBS underneath the Media Trust, if the Media Trust can cope with it."

JC: What sort of time scale would this change involve?

DS: We've got new trustees, who I like very much. I think they're very capable people, but we don't want to swamp them, so the idea is that they get their feet under the table, get into the job and we look at FIBS later in the year

Meanwhile Dick Sawle as chairman continues talks with government about how to achieve it - because there are some practicalities and details to be sorted out. This winter I think we'll see these discussions going on with a view to some major changes possibly being made at FIBS in the spring.

There seems to be a consensus all the way around that this is the desired course to be taken.



JC: What other benefits would there be if FIBS was managed by the Media Trust, aside from that which you mentioned, with a perception of government interference being removed?

DS: There are benefits in the day to day management. I think the Station Manager at FIBS has been in an awkward position with regard to whose authority she comes under and who she goes to with day to day problems.

It is much better that those day to day problems are tackled by the Media Trust than government which has a thousand and one other things to do and, frankly, day to day problems at FIBS aren't high on the priority list.

So there are advantages for the radio station and I think there are advantages all round as well, by looking at advertising, programming and other matters, a bit like *Penguin News* has done.

We only need to look at *Penguin News* and see how, over six years, we've gone from a major subsidy to small profit.

I don't think that would have happened under government, with due respect, but has been possible under the Media Trust. JC: How much of a change will this mean to the actual role of Media Trust members?

DS: A big part of my job this week has been to put the trustees on a professional footing. I think the role of trustee is changing from what it was before. They are going to become far more involved in the media.

They won't just turn up for tea and buns and a general discussion, which was the only real way forward a few years ago when other things needed to be tackled, but now to actually bring individual expertise in to look at aspects of the operation and advise.

At the end of the day, the managing editor of *Penguin News* and the radio station manager have to do the management and be heavily involved in the work, but I think you would welcome some expert advice on things like the web, distribution, production.

But first they have got to be given time to get their feet under

the table.

JC: What is the next step from here?

DS: I go back to England and wait the outcome of some discussions that are going to take place here. I have already, with Dick Sawle, made a number of recommendations. Some are minor, some are major.

I am there in the background all the time and I expect to have a hands away role and be there as an advisor.

I would like to thank everyone here who has made it such an enjoyable week. It has been a very hard working week but I've had an open door and a lot of smiling faces and friendly greetings and people have been interested.

Everyone, from the radio phone in, to the public meeting, to people I've met on the street or at various restaurants has been friendly and

constructive.

Elderly unit gets the go-ahead Postage rise: new system to blame

A PROPOSAL for the creation of an elderly care suite at the hospital is to go ahead.

Acting Governor Miss Harriet Hall said the idea for a suite had been under consideration for some time, "...but the current plan would bring together a number of new improvements in the hospital facilities.

The aim of the new elderly care suite is to create accommodation for those who are not able to look after themselves in their own homes, without them having to stay in wards where they lose their privacy.

Miss Hall said, "In the past there have been concerns that the funds required to build such accommodation were too great and so a new proposal has been developed to convert existing facilities and combine a number of projects to achieve savings but with the same, or an enhanced, result.

Executive Council agreed to a proposal build a new purposebuilt isolation unit and convert the current unit into a new maternity

suite. The current maternity suite and a four bed ward will be converted into an elderly care suite.

Miss Hall added, "At the same time the nurse call system and the fire alarm system would be up-

"Combining all these projects, although it sounds complicated, will give good value for money and a much improved facility. Hopefully all this can be completed by the end of 2005.1

Executive Council also agreed to a new Memorandum of Understanding between the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) and the British Forces governing the use of the hospital.

Miss Hall said, "This changes the basis of the way the military contribute financially towards the costs of the hospital and ensures their contribution more closely matches their use of FIG facilities.

"It should reduce bureaucracy for the FIG but there won't of course be any reduction in serv-

THE price of postage is to rise

The Ministry of Defence and the United Kingdom Postal Authority both levy charges in respect of carriage and handling of mail despatched from the Falklands. Miss Hall said, "A new system of measuring how much mail is sent has recently come into use and as a result there has been an increase in handling charges.

"There have been other increases to the costs of running the

Post Office and so postage rates are going to rise by 2p for local letters and 1p for local packets and printed paper.

"Airmail costs will rise by 5p for letters 2p for postcards and increases of £1 for registration and 50p for insurance.

"Christmas cards, which have a special reduced rate, will increase by 2p for local and surface delivery and 5p for airmail."

Loligo licence fees set to increase

FEES for the second season of loligo squid fishing are to be increased.

The licence fee for loligo will be increased by 10% from last year. Executive Council also agreed that the dates for the second season should be changed to 15 July to 30 September. This will shorten the season but brings it forward into July (in the past it has run from August 1 - October 31).

The councillor with responsi-

bility for Fisheries, Richard Cockwell said the decision has been taken on the advice of fishery scientists.

He said, "The catches should be better at that time of year. The scientists say the peak time is earlier rather than later.

"Previously the last three weeks or so of the season would see hardly any catch at all because all the squid had gone by then.

Jhelum and New Island South turned down

TWO requests for funding have been turned down by Executive Council

The first was from the Museum and National Trust and concerned the preservation of the Jhelum

Miss Hall said, "Councillors took the view that the proposal to protect the hulk from seawater and marine borers and to protect it from the weather by covering it was not necessarily the best way forward as, although it would preserve the Jhelum, the hulk would be concealed by a large shed that would be built around it.

"They have therefore asked the Museum to consider further whether there could be a partial salvage of the wreck and whether there were other options for conservation.

Another request for funding came from the New Island South Conservation Trust and was for project and development funding.

Miss Hall said Executive Council supported the work of the Trust and in particular its current five year programme, "...however they were not in a position to be able to commit government funding to the Trust this year."

Protection plan for seabirds adopted

THE Falklands is to adopt a National Plan of Action on Seabirds.

The plan was produced by Falklands Conservation and the Fisheries Department and written under the guidelines of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organisation's International Plan of Action for Reducing Incidental Catches of Seabirds.

How do the tax changes introduced on 1 January 2004 affect me?

By Taxation Officer Ken Eccles

This is a question that seems to be asked of anyone working in, or out of, the Taxation Office any time of the day, every day.

The changes were all outlined in the Falkland Islands Tax Policy Review Group Final Report, which was approved on 24 July 2003 by ExCo.

The main changes were intro-duced in the Taxes (Amendment) Ordinance 2003, the Taxes (Benefits in Kind) Rules 2003, the Taxes (Benefits in Kind) (Amendment) Rules 2004 and the Payments on Account of Tax (Amendment) Regulations 2004.

In summary, the major changes were:

For individuals - an increase in the Personal Allowance from £6500 to £12000, clarification of taxable benefits in kind received by employees and a change in the rates of tax payable down to 20% and 25%.

2 For incorporated businesses (limited companies) - payment of Advanced Corporation Tax (ACT) on dividends was abolished The rates of tax payable down to 20% and 25% and the levels of depreciation allowances that can be claimed have also been changed.

MPA based companies will now also have to start paying corporation tax to the Falkland Islands on their company's Falkland Island

For non-incorporated businesses (self-employed people) - a change in the levels of depreciation allowances that can be claimed

For employers - the introduction of a statutory £50 fine for failing to submit the monthly POAT return within 14 days following the end of the month for which that form and payment was

It is important to note that for individuals and unincorporated businesses these changes only apply to income earned or taxable profits received on, or after, 1 January 2004.

So, when completing your Tax Return and/or preparing any business accounts for the year ended 31 December 2003, the tax legislation in place before 1 January 2004 still applies.

For incorporated businesses (limited companies) the changes affect the company's business accounts which start on, or after, 1 January 2004.

For employers the £50 fine will be charged on POAT forms which are due to be with the Taxation Office by 14 April 2004.

The Taxation Office has prepared detailed guides on the changes to the tax legislation.

Copies of those guides are available on request from us.

Wool market report for week ending March 26 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GENERAL OVERVIEW

Greasy wool prices once again wobbled around during auctions in Australia last week.

No sales were reported from South Africa or New Zealand

Buyers reacted to the larger than anticipated offering in Australia during the week and the considerably larger forecast offering next week. by reducing their early buying limits. However, as shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide", prices at the close of trading generally finished the week quite steady with finer micron fleece wool lots down a few pence per kilogram clean and broader micron fleece wool lots up a few pence per kilogram clean. The exceptions to this trend were the mid micron lots which lost up to 8

Buying activity was widespread with most of the world's major topmakers appearing to be present in the market. In addition, of particular note, was the strong presence of Chinese buying interest around

the auction floor. Very little wool selling was reported from other countries of the world. It would seem that many farmers and their selling agents are waiting to see what happens in the Australian markets over the next few weeks before committing to a particular selling strategy

British Quotations for Tops. British top quotations moved in response to the world's greasy wool prices. Top quotations lost a little bit of "ground" at the finer end of the micron spectrum but remained firm at the broader end.

World Markets.

In Australia, of the 70,401 bales offered to the trade, 57,904 bales were actually sold, with a pass-in rate of 17.6%. This compares to pass-in rates of approximately 12% for the last week or two. This clearly indicates farmer/broker dissatisfaction with the current price levels.

included in the offering were 4,765 bales of crossbred wool, of which 4,159 bales were sold (pass-in rate 12.3%)

Poor squid catches causing concern

POOR SOUID catches and the possibility of advancing the closure of the season is being considered in Argentina following a meeting of the Argentine Federal Fishery Council (CFP) Supervisory Commission on Squid.

A further proposal suggests having the 30-foreign bare-boat chartered vessels, participating in season, withdraw from national fishery grounds. The proposal was presented by the president of the Chamber of Squid Jigger Vessel Owners of Argen-tina (CAPA), Mario Redini, at a meeting on March 23, at CFP headquarters

According to a report from 'Diario de Madryn' the proposal had overwhelming support including sci-

entists from the National Institute of Fishery Research and Develop-ment, INIDEP. The petition called for the immediate return to port of all chartered vessels, a temporary suspension of required squid landings at onshore processing plants, reimbursement of export tariffs paid and the opening of the fishery zone up to parallel 43°S.

INIDEP advised that in the event squid catch indexes should continue to register, in the next fifteen days all-time lows, fishery grounds should be closed, "...until a new exploratory survey is undertaken," zone between the 44 'S and 59°S parallel. Apparently the Illex report on the exploratory cruise undertaken in

February by INIDEP showed a marked absence of pre-recruits in the fishery grounds. This is of vital importance since the amount of prerecruits directly determines the volume of squid that could be fished in the 2005 season.

CAPA had already declared a state of alert on March 12 for the squid sector, in response to the low catches obtained during the last seasons coupled with the results of the February exploratory cruise north of parallel 44°S. On that occasion CAPA suggested that the Argentine squid jigger fleet "is over-sized" and reiterated it during the Supervisory Commission on Squid at CFP headquarters. (FIS/MP).-

Kirchner vigil in Tierra del fuego

ARGENTINE president Nestor Kirchner will be present in the Falklands War Veterans vigil that is annually commemorated in Rio Grande and Úshuaia on April 2, announced the Tierra del Fuego governor's of-

According to Tierra del Fuego Protocol Office president Kirchner will be arriving at 18:00 hours on April 1 in Rio Grande to participate in the War Veterans vigil until early April 2, 00:30 hours.

He will then fly to Ushuaia where at 11:00 hours, together with Tierra del Fuego Governor Jorge Colazo, local officials and war veterans he will participate in the central acts commemorating the 22nd anniversary of the April 1982 events.

President Kirchner will be honouring the promise he made last year during the campaign trail to the Falklands war veterans in the Rio Grande vigil tent over looking the sea next to the Monument to the Fallen in the Falklands. Government House in Buenos Aires has confirmed the program, which according to Tierra del Fuego sources is expected to attract Argentine and foreign press given the importance of the commemoration.

Majority of Maya V crew may be free this week

IT IS too early to know when the Uruguayan crew of the Maya V will return home, the Uruguayan Consulate said yesterday, but hopefully for the majority matters will be resolved this week.

32 of the 35 crew arrested and charged for allegedly poaching Patagonian toothfish from an Australian EEZ, shortened their forced stay in Australia by pleading guilty in the Perth Magistrate's court last

Although many felt the charges were wrongly brought against them with the senior officers only previously charged - like many Australian nationals, the crew took the 'guilty' plea to speed up delivery of an outcome.

The court has been told previously that it is likely that the fines reached may almost be equalled out by time spent in custody, which

would mean automatic release and repatriation to their country of pass-

The severity of the fine will be decided later this week when the 32 are sentenced and the amounts of the fines revealed. A small group of three men refused to plead not guilty last week, and have one more chance to either plead guilty or go to trial, which could take months before being listed.

Memorial nears completion News in brief

THE construction of the Argentine war memorial at Darwin is almost complete

The Regional Manager of AWG (Falklands) Ltd, the company contracted to construct the memorial says the company is at the. " .final stages of the works

The construction began on February 25. Now, Ken Mackenzie of AWG says the work is almost over. "The memorial pieces are in place. the crosses have been installed and the plaques have been fitted

There is some tiling work around the main cross, fencing and general tidving up still to be carried out

The memorial is expected to be officially approved by an architect representing the Argentine Families on or around April 17.

AWG employed a core workforce of four people for the job but Mr Mackenzie says this increased from time to time, pending on the type of work being carried out


When the units were being transported we had a crane driver and lorry drivers, an engineer setting out as well as our supervision.

The installation of all of the new crosses required an increase in numbers to carry out all of the hand excavations and concreting.

The Argentine architect has been in the Islands since the materials for the memorial arrived. In addition, an engineer from Argentina also visited for two weeks.

Mr Mackenzie says, "He was responsible for ensuring that the ground conditions were suitable for the type of construction method being adopted.

A Clerk of Works representing the company to which AWG is



contracted left the Islands last Sat-

Mr Mackenzie says his company experienced some "resolvable" problems during the construc-

The existing site is not as dimensionally accurate as was indicated on the drawings so the installation of a structure, which has been prefabricated and therefore dimensionally fixed, caused a few problems. The fact that the structures are curved and large required consideration as how best to transport them to the site.

'All problems are however resolvable.

Mr Mackenzie says that overall the project has gone smoothly. "We have been very fortunate with the weather

The whole team involved, which includes our staff, the architect, the Clerk of Works, the haulage contractor, the crane operator and other sub-contractors, have all worked very conscientiously to ensure that the project has gone as

smoothly as possible.

The result is a matter of individual opinion but from a construction point of view, we are satisfied with the overall result

Councillor John Birmingham called in to the Darwin cemetery at the weekend. He believes, will look tidy and respectful

If we must have a cemetery, then this is as dignified as you could probably get.

Mr Mackenzie says he has "no knowledge" of when or if any inauguration ceremony will take place for the memorial. He said, "There has been no discussion with our company in that respect.'

Dr Barton said companies involved in the fishery have been informed of the early closure "A decision on the level of refund due on licence fees will be made as soon as possible.

THERE'S an ancient Chinese curse which says, "May you live in interesting times." With the news of poor squid catches once again, one can't help but wonder if someone out there has placed just such a vexation upon the Falklands.

In addition to the ongoing headache of Argentine interference, for the second time in three years, we've had a most disappointing illex season and it looks as though we could begin to feel the financial pinch.

I'll freely admit I'm curious to see how councillors will deal with the situation.

Let's just hope they avoid the approach adopted by the administration of 1992.

In what the then Chief Executive Ronnie Sampson deemed, "The worst week in the history of the Islands since the Argentine invasion," Argentina announced it was offering illex licences to operate over seven months in direct competition against the Falkland's ninety day licences.

In reaction to a predicted loss of £12m, councillors, although quick to warn against panic, agreed to dramatically reduce capital projects, freeze recruitment and "severely restrict" overtime.

Contract workers came under fire and Mr Sampson used a Legislative Council meeting to defensively remind councillors that contract staff were too often referred to as if they were, "...some kind of parasitical growth." He asked them who Islanders would turn to if they wanted teeth pulled or sheep examined - roles filled by contract officers.

So what will our modern day council do? Will they adopt a 'woe is me' approach and slice through the budget in an attempt to save, save, save?

Or will they retain a collective level head and communicate in, as they did two years ago, carefully considered phrases such as "prudent rephasing"?

The manner in which councillors cope with this downturn in the fishery and consequential loss of income could make or break their political futures.

Let's hope they rise to the challenge and avoid taking the wrong decisions through panic.

Albatross conservationist welcomes government support for seabirds

A MOVE by the government to aid the survival of the albatross has been welcomed by a Falklands seabird conservationist.

Dr Ben Sullivan of Falklands Conservation says the long-term survival of the Falkland Islands Black-browed albatross population has been boosted by the Falkland Islands Government's adoption of a National Plan of Action-Seabirds (NPOA-S) to reduce the incidental catch of seabirds in longline and trawl fisheries.

The Falkland Islands plans were drafted by Falklands Conservation and the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB) under the guidelines of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization.

Dr Sullivan says the introduction of mitigation measures to the longlining fleet in recent years. "... has led to a significant reduction in the number of seabirds killed.

"The vast majority of seabird mortality in the Falkland Islands is caused by factory trawlers that discharge offal."

He says the adoption of a specific plan to address the problems caused by trawling makes, "...a significant first in seabird conservation around the world."

Also adopted was an assessment directive to investigate seabird interactions with the large squid jigging fleet that operates in Falkland Islands waters.

Dr Sullivan says this means the.
"...entire offshore commercial fishing fleet in the Falkland Islands is covered by detailed plans to reduce seabird mortality."

Director of Fisheries Dr John Barton this week commented, "The adoption of these plans is a major step forward in ensuring that the Falkland Islands fishery operates with minimal impact on the world's seabird populations".

The adoption of Falkland Islands NPOA-S and accompanying plans coincides with the UK ratification of the Agreement on the Conservation of Albatross and Petrels (ACAP), which Dr Sullivan describes as, "... a significant component of which focuses on reducing the number of birds killed by introducing mitigation measures and educating fishers."

The UK's ratification also includes the Falklands, South Georgia/ South Sandwich Islands and British Antarctic Territory.

Since 2001 Falklands Conserva-



tion's Seabirds at Sea Team and the Falkland Islands Fisheries Department have been working closely with the local fishing industry to develop and trial mitigation methods for trawlers

Dr Sullivan says this team work has culminated in experimental trials, "...that identified a successful mitigation method that will become a licensing condition for all trawlers for the second season in 2004 and is hoped will reduce seabird deaths to negligible levels in a relatively short-time frame."

The Falklands is the stronghold of the Black-browed albatross, with over 70% of the global population breeding in the Islands.

In 2001, Falklands Conservation conducted a complete census, which resulted in the re-classification of the species as Endangered by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature in 2003. This census suggested that between 1995 and 2000. over 87,500 breeding pairs were lost, a rate of 4% per year, or two albatross per hour.

To halt the decline of many albatross and petrel species, campaigners believe fisheries mortality needs to be addressed on an international level and hope ACAP and several NPOA-S being drafted for South American countries will help to reduce seabind mortality throughout the South American region.

Dr. Euan Dunn of the RSPB said. "The adoption of these Falkland Action Plans is a milestone in protecting the beleaguered albatrosses of the Southern Ocean

"They put the Falklands at the forefront of seabird-friendly fishing and have lit a beacon for other fishing nations to follow."

Fishing rights review to be determined by market forces

MARKET forces will be left to determine the date of a review of long term fishing ownership rights, it was decided in the Fisheries Committee meeting this morning.

In the future, companies will be able to get fisheries rights for a 25 year term to encourage long term investment in the industry.

Director of Fisheries John Barton had recommended to the meeting that the government review those rights after 15 years to decide whether those companies should have rights extended beyond the 25 years.

However after a lengthy discussion the committee decided not to fetter a future government, or the

fishing industry, to a dated review, but simply monitor it constantly.

The committee believe that when the 25 year ownership begins to draw near, or even sooner, fishing companies will want to decide whether to invest further and so are likely to put pressure on government for a decision on whether rights will be extended or ended. As such a review of the system will be arrived at naturally.

The committee also had a general discussion about the state of the illex fishery this year.

Councillor Richard Cockwell described it as "Pretty dire." S Gyford

Islander Mensun's big secret | Learning about farm life

Oxford Maritime archaeologist Mensun Bound (right) has broken a two year silence concerning a discovery his team made of a 16th century Portuguese galleon near the tiny island of Mozambique, which sank carrying gold, spices and Ming porcelain

The wreck is known as the Fort San Sebastian Wreck after the great citadel that is situated on land 200 metres from where the wreck was found. It dates to the peak of the Portuguese empire, an empire that stretched from Brazil to Japan and which was the unchallenged domain of the Portuguese for almost a hundred years.

The gold, in the form of small 'bun and finger' ingots, beads and Jewelry, was found on February 24, 2002, during a routine dive in which all that had been found were a few strips of lead that had been used for caulking the hull.

Although his team was overjoyed by the discovery. Mr Bound admitted that he felt some inner sense of turmoil

He said. "In my left hand. I held a mangled piece of lead, in my right a slab of gold... I was supposed to be deeply interested in the lead and coolly indifferent to the gold. But the lead told me nothing we did not already know, it added nothing to the sum of our work. I was utterly unmoved by it. But with the gold it was different. It made my hair prickle.

The initial excitement that greeted the discovery of the gold soon began to fade as more and more of it was found, and the realisation grew that the team was in serious

If, on the poor malaria-ridden island, anybody realized what had been found, the lives of the team, as somebody rather colourfully put it. would not be worth a bent farthing. Even if they were not knifed the wreck would be torn apart in a mini-goldrush.

The nearest centre of civilization was five hours drive through the bush. There were bandits at night and road-blocks during the day. There was little the government could do to help the team. Within the government only the President, the Minister of Culture, and their most immediate and trusted associates knew of it. The Minister of Culture insisted to the team that no men-



tion should be made of the discovery until the excavation was over and the gold was safe in government hands

The gold was smuggled ashore from the site in dive bags and in the suits of the divers. On the team nobody was allowed to speak of it outside the house where they lived. and even in the house the word itself, 'gold', was prohibited: instead the team spoke in hushed tones of the 'shiny' or 'the yellow stuff'

At first it was simply kept in a cupboard but as more was found it was concealed beneath the floor tiles in Mr Bound's room and he slept on it. "It was quite a stressful time," he admitted.

Eventually the gold was flown to the capital in a light aircraft hidden within a cargo of slightly rancid lobsters. Each lobster had a piece of gold within it. By the time the plane got to Maputo the smell was overwhelming and the cargo was waved through the airport without any delay. The gold is now safely stored in the government bank in Maputo. We all drew a huge sigh of relief when it was out of our hands." said Mr Bound

No interest was shown on the island in the blue and white Ming porcelain from the wreck which had been made in 1553 during the reign of the Chinese emperor Jiajing (1522-66).

The porcelain was exquisitely painted with human scenes, mythological animals, birds and flowers. "It is of outstanding archaeological. historical and art historical value," says Mr Bound. "Thanks to our work, Mozambique now has the finest collection of provinenced export porcelain in the entire Indian Ocean

Postmaster explains long mail delays

THE POSTMASTER has explained why some members of the public have had to wait up to six months for their mail

Moira Eccles explained told Penguin News, "In October 2003, Royal Mail, as part of a global review of seafreight supply, changed supplier. Unfortunately, they encountered a number of operational and control problems related to the change, which they were unable to resolve. In early December they changed to the current supplier in order to restore a reliable service.

One of the consequences of this change was that, very regretfully. some economy mail (posted in October) was delayed for an unacceptable period in the facilities of the previous supplier. The last of this mail (six bags) was despatched in February

Royal Mail has expressed regret at the inconvenience and concern caused to customers by the delay. However, they are pleased to say that the working relationship with the new supplier is, "... excellent" and they do not foresee exceptional delays in the future.

Economy Mail is now leaving the UK for the Falkland Islands approximately once per month and the sailing time is approximately 30 days

The children then helped to stir the cream from the separated milk into butter, prompting some squeals of delight.



The children also looked at a peat bank, and Neil showed them how peat is cut. They were later shown how the peat is used for heating and cooking in the Watson's Rayburn stove.


The sunny weather allowed the children to enjoy their packed lunches on Long Island's beautiful sand beach. After lunch there was free time for sandcastle building and shell collecting.

Sailing record up for grabs

IN ANSWER to Mr Cheek's query regarding sailing records from New Zealand to the Falklands. I can state with certainty that the times that he mentions are not records, in fact no where near.

The fastest monohull time, that I am aware of, is Bernard Stamm's time in last years Around Alone race. He took sixteen days to reach Stanley from Auckland. I should point out that two competitors in that race called into Stanley, both for repairs to significant damage that they had been carrying for several days. Stamm had a broken keel and the other competitor Bruce Schwab had a broken boom and other significant structural damage (his time was about nineteen days).

What would a modern monohull be capable of undamaged? These guys were also sailing alone so it can be expected that a crewed yacht could knock a significant amount off their times.

As for the multihull record: I can't recall another multihull calling at the Islands out of New Zealand in recent times. However fully powered up multihull should be able to achieve a time of around ten, to twelve, days.

The current attempt on the Jules Verne record, by *Geronmo*, will be close to this time. However as this is a non-stop, round the

world, record attempt they will not have stopped in either country so would not qualify for any record. I don't think that Ellen would appreciate her time from a shakedown cruise being put up as a record. Therefore I would say that the multihull record is up for grabs, any takers?

It is unlikely that any race sponsor would be attracted to the islands enough to use us as an official race stopover. However it should be borne in mind that as there is no marina facility here there is never likely to be an official race stopover in the Islands; therefore any records are most likely to be set by damaged boats calling in for repairs.

One stopover here would easily pay for the cost a modest marina development (modern monohull racing yachts have minimum draught requirements of around six metres). If we had the facilities we could market ourselves as an official emergency stop. It's a chicken and egg situation but with proper marketing the increasing ocean racing calendar could be a significant financial opportunity for the islands.

We are in a prefect position geographically, let's use it.

Physio takes a backward step

AS A trained physiotherapist (about to leave the islands) I cannot understand the reasoning behind the decision to change the physiotherapy service to provide more time for chronic patients and add on waiting time for the acute patients. To me that is a backward step and is not improving physiotherapy care.

If acute injuries are seen early, they are much more likely to be resolved quickly with less treatment. Having to wait for treatment, the problem often worsens and usually takes a lot longer to treat. There is also the risk of it becoming a recurring, chronic problem, needing ongoing treatment. This will just add to the current burden. With chronic conditions, the effect of Physiotherapy is usually not as significant and the benefits more short term.

I agree with David Snape that one physiotherapist is not adequate to provide care for the military base, and KEMH patients as well as the Falkland Island population. There is the added disadvantage of no private physio to take on cases that are willing to pay rather than wait for treatment.

I realise there is no easy solution. It appears that the need for occupational therapy is stalling the decision to employ another physiotherapist. I do not believe employing a fulltime occupational therapist is warranted for a population this size.

I realise it is not ideal, but in small, isolated communities, a physiotherapist usually provides the services for both.

Advice can easily be sought by phone or email and if necessary, an occupational therapist visits to carry out assessments and give advice and recommendations (as is done with visiting specialist doctors here).

At present, the Falkland Island government shares the cost of the physiotherapist with the British Forces. Is there really not enough funding available for at least one full time physiotherapist for the local population (who seem to be crying out for this)?

If not, and chronic care is of such high priority, what about employing a part time physiotherapy aide to help with chronic patients so the physiotherapist can at least maintain the current service to those with acute problems.

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Getting fit and having fun? Is that really possible?

DO YOU want to get fit and have fun at the same time? Then aquarobics might just be the exercise for you.

The pool-based class runs four times a week at the Stanley Leisure Centre.

Instructor at three of the classes Sarah Clement says the benefits of exercising in water are numerous. "It's a really safe way of getting fit: if you fall over, you won't hurt yourself as the surrounding water cushions you.

"Aquarobics is a non weight bearing exercise which means the water supports you and pressure is not placed on the joints as it may be through other exercise, such as road running."

She says exercising in water also makes your heart work harder. "It increases your blood volume due to the hydrostatic pressure caused by the water surrounding your body - your heart pumps harder to push the extra fluid through your veins."

Sarah also says exercises done in water are more challenging than out of water. "... due to eddy currents which are produced by other people exercising, this means aquarobics is great for balance and coordination too."

You'll feel better the day after too. Aquarobics is an exercise which discourages the build up of lactic acid in the body, which means you can avoid next-day stiffness.

Sarah reminds that, as with any other exercise, the benefit of aquarobics is, "...largely dependent on how much work you put in," but the exercise is done to music which manages to motivate even the most sluggish participants.

Sarah attained her Aquafusion Professional Registration Certificate at the Francis Holland School in London in July 2000. In her studies she learned about. "...anatomy, warm up exercises, use of music, class planning, aerobic exercises, teaching practice, safety and flexibility."

She was required to sit an exam on the skeleton, the spine, joints.



cardiorespiratory fitness, muscular endurance and more

Sarah runs three classes in the pool each week. A forth, for pre and post natal women, is held by Luci Bennett on Fridays. Sarah says the class is an excellent way for expectant and new mothers to exercise. "... as they are completely supported by the water." However she adds. "In order to join the class, ladies need to obtain a note from their midwife or doctor to ensure it is safe for them to participate."

Sarah's classes take place on Mondays. Thursdays and Sundays, and cost £2.65 per session.

Monday nights, between 7 and 8pm, are aerobics sessions. Sarah says this is good for overall fitness, gentle toning and weight loss.

She explains how the Monday class works. "We start off with a warm up of the main joints of the body, then a pulse raiser which gently warms you up and gets your heart rate going a bit faster, and a short stretch."

"Then we move on to the aero-

bic session (the main part of the class) which is the warm up, peak and cool down. We then work on muscle strength and endurance, which helps the overall strength of your skeletal structure. Last of all we work on flexibility and a stretch at the end."

Thursday is "circuits" nights, in which participants try a number of exercises for two or three minute intervals. This class, which is also held between 7 and 8pm is primarily for toning the body. However, it is by no means an easy class. Sarah says, "... in between circuits we also do some aerobic work out to make sure the session covers the cardiovascular side of things.

"It is also very good for arthritic people as the joints are supported by the water and all the exercises create more synovial fluid which lubricates the joints."

She also says circuits can be adapted to an individual's capabilities

Sunday's classes, between 5 and 6pm, are for more confident swim-

mers as they are held in the deep water of the swimming pool.

Sarah says. This session alternates between circuits and aerobics sessions and is really for the more confident swimmer as it is held in the deepwater part of the pool. It is the most challenging and physically demanding session of the week."

Aquarobics presents an attractive method of exercise to those who may feel self conscious in the gym. Sarah says. "If people are shy about wearing a swimming costume, they can wear t-shirts and shorts but bear in mind most of the exercise is under water so you're not in full view of other people."

"Just come along, but remember at the Monday and Thursday classes, wear your socks as they help prevent slipping on the pool floor."

Sarah is keen to see new faces in the pool. She says, "It's very social and always a lot of fun."

"You can choose to exercise in pairs or small groups or, if you want space, exercises can be done on your own as well"

1312 Flight's special Falklands presentation

A Hercules detachment was established at RAF Stanley in the Falkland Islands on October 15, 1982, and was subsequently reformed as No 1312 Flight on September 1, 1983.

Today the Flight maintains operations with one Hercules Air Transport and one VC10K Air Refuelling aircraft.

Captain Hamlin commented. "No 1312 Flight is extremely proud to have supported operations within the Falkland Islands over the past twenty years, and to have had this service recognised through the award of a Badge that reflects its close association with the Islands."

Water monitoring ensures safe shellfish

FOLLOWING fears that an algael bloom poisoned shellfish in the Falklands last year, shellfish growers Falklands Fresh say they are taking water samples every fortnight from Darwin, Goose Green and Brenton Loch

The samples are sent to a registered laboratory in Punta Arenas Results are returned by e-mail listing all the different species of algae

in the water

Simon Hardcastle of Falkands Fresh said very few species of algae are harmful and currently there no toxic species detected in the water column from these ar-

Sea water from the same areas is also monitored for salinity, temperature, pH and oxygen Mr Harcastle explained, "Potential algae blooms can be detected by a change in the normal monitoring of the above parameters. Harvesting and sales of shellfish can therefore be halted if the levels are seen to dramatically change and a more intensive testing regime can be initiated

Shellfish from both oysters and mussels are also sent away to laboratories for testing of toxic algae presence. Bacterial monitoring of the shellfish flesh is taken, and Mr. Harcastle assured, " .. results have continued to be low for bacterial coliforms, e-coli and salmonella.

This testing programme will lay down the foundation to enable a better understanding of the biol-



ogy of the Falklands inshore wa-

In addition, he says, this could pave the way for, " further shellfish farms around the Islands creating the potential for growth in another industry increasing Falkands exports.

Falklands Fresh Ltd have quantitles of mussels waiting to be harvested for export.

Mr Hardcastle said, "The slow development of Aquaculture Legislation for the Falklands to enable shellfish to be exported to other countries, and to encourage external investment is playing a big part in holding up growth in the indus-

Falkland Fresh Ltd is however expanding its mussel farm at Goose Green, "... to produce 150,000 of mussels."

He added that the company has increased its canned range of Falkland Island produce to include mussels, crab and oysters which can be found in the West Store.





Teenagers come out in support of the Jhelum

THANKS solely to the efforts of Community School students, the wreck of the *Jhelum* will receive some desperately-needed attention this week.

The teenagers of Year 11 Ross instigated a fund-raising campaign at the school after hearing about the plight of the vessel

the plight of the vessel.


More than £600 was raised through collections in the school and by a stall dedicated to the Jhelum at their fete (£145). Notable donations were made by Michael Brownlee (£40), Jason Stephenson and family (£40), TerriSue Clifford (£25) and Kieran Morrison who spent break and lunchtimes prowling the school with a basket and collecting donations.

"The FICS kids and their art teacher, Tim Simpson, have been superb," says Museum Manager Leona Roberts. "It shows what our teenagers are capable of and says a great deal about the responsible forward-thinking attitude of these kids.

"Thank you 11R for getting things started and well done to the whole school."

Martech (Falklands) will be placing acrojacks around the 155year-old hulk, giving vital support to the collapsing bow area.

It is hoped that the acrojacks will reduce the stress on the struc-



ture, which is dropping sideways at a worrying pace. This will not save the vessel, but should help take the immediate strain off the structure.

Following last week's Executive Council report, Mrs Roberts said the Museum and National Trust felt that it would be useful to clarify the proposals for the Jhelum project.

The plan (above) gives a basic idea of the proposal which involved building a coffer dam around the bulk

Mrs Roberts said isolating the

Jhelum from the sea would quickly kill the gribble and teredo (marine borers) which are eating the timbers from inside.

"The bund would also have

"The bund would also have protected the vessel from tide and wave damage. The coffer dam would have incorporated a small walkway, allowing visitors to get close to the structure.

"At a later date some kind of protective roofing would probably have been required on the hulk, but the proposal was not to 'build a shed' over it."

However funding was not given

for this project, so the Trust are looking at other options, although none of these will keep the hulk in the harbour in the long-term.

"There is no denying that this would have been a large project and we do appreciate the concern over funding in the current economic climate," says Mrs Roberts,

"But what price do we put on the protection of our heritage?"

In the words of a member of the public who wrote to the Trust recently: "The *Jhelum* is unique... it can't breed and it will never regenerate by itself."

Helping kids discover their heritage

THE Museum and National Trust is launching a membership scheme next week to encourage residents and visitors alike to appreciate the fascinating history and heritage of the Falklands.

Report of the Planning and Building Committee's April 1 meeting

WHEN compared with the meeting held in March, this was a much busier committee with no less than twenty-two applications for planning permission to be considered and twelve building permits reported upon.

Chaired by the Honourable Richard Cockwell, all members were present and these were the Honourable Norma Edwards, Gerald Cheek, Les Harris, Mike Harris, Paul Phillips and Mike McLeod.

Only one member of the public (the writer) was present and the "open" session of the meeting lasted a little under one-and-a-quarter hours.

Following declarations of interest and confirmation of the minutes of two meetings held last month, the Environmental Planning Officer, Antony Lancaster, undermatters arising reported upon relevant decisions of Executive Council.

He understood that the Development Plan had been adopted and in consequence CDs would be made available to the public, also a printed version for which a small charge would be made to cover the cost of printing. ExCo had also accepted the recommendation to refuse government's outline application to build houses on land between 8 Anderson Drive and 20 Hansen Hill.

Before moving on to new applications, members were asked to grant planning permission to a development deferred at the March meeting. This was in respect of a dwelling to be erected at 8 Anderson Drive for Evan Jones and members agreed to accept the recommenda-

There was considerable discussion on the proposed siting of an independent isolation ward in the form of a purpose-built prefabricated cabin to be sited at the northeast wing of the KEMH. This was proposed with a flat roof and did not appear to match existing external finishes which, members felt, was contrary to the policy adopted for similar buildings proposed by members of the public.

It was explained that for the reasons of use to which the building will be put it was not practicable, but if there was insistence then there would be unknown cost implications and an inevitable delay in what was an urgently needed facility for the hospital. The Committee agreed to grant planning permission whilst noting the absence of a pitched roof which they would have preferred to have seen incorporated

Applications granted conditional planning permission were the following proposed developments the erection of a 40ft telescopic tiltover mast at 75 Davis Street for Robert McLeod; Cable and Wireless' application to erect a new pole and divert existing cables via a new pole at 41 Davis Street; PWD's proposals to erect a screen with roof to match the existing adjacent to the boiler house at Sir Rex Hunt House on John Street, also to crect and replace fencing at Sulivan House, Ross Road West; the erection of a garage, sun room and child's playhouse at his property on 6

Felton Court by Christopher Ford.

Also approved for conditional planning permission was government's scheme to provide seven parking spaces including the relocation of a fuel tank to the rear of the Pod Gift Shop and Jetty Visitor Centre! the provision of a sec-ond exit from "The Gallery" on Dean Street for the Falkland Islands Company; the temporary siting of three reefer containers at the Beaver Hangar on Ross Road West for Kelper Stores Limited (this was in retrospect as, due to a breakdown in electrical equipment, the siting had to be urgently undertaken in advance of approval although informal approval had been sought and given): Ken and Jackie Morrison's proposal for a double garage to be erected at 13 lan Campbell Drive: Edgar Morrison and Nichola Summers proposal to relocate the C and R unit on their property at 4 Capricorn Road with an access off Beaver Road; the erection of a garage and porch at 5 Felton Court for Alistair Wilkinson: off-street parking providing three (possibly four) spaces at 29 Fitzroy Road for Pauline Hawksworth, a dwelling at 11 Hansen Hill for Neil Clifton and Carmen Miranda, and the construction of a roof on a Portakabin also the replacement and enlargement of the garage at his property at 10 Jeremy Moore Avenue for Pete

Finlay Ferguson's proposal to build, from a double Wyseplan unit, a dwelling at 4 Pioneer Row was also granted planning conditional permission. One condition requires that development is not to start until an Article 6 direction had been passed by the Governor. This is due to the limited area of the site and means that any future development must first get planning permission with no "permitted development" rights applicable.

In the discussion on plans submitted for the erection of a oneand-a-half-storey house on land south of 57 Fitzroy Road (to be known as 65 Davis Street) for Mr and Mrs Ron Roberts, for which permission was granted, members asked that all future applications for planning permission in respect of buildings must show roof overhang on the drawings to enable their proper consideration of the proposal.

Also attracting a lot of discussion was the application submitted by the Falkland Islands Meat Company for a disposal site for inspected low health risk surplus abattoir material located at the beach area south of Port Harriet Farm. One letter of objection had been received and was considered by the Committee during the review.

It was explained that the Abattoir was now working at full stretch, with over 400 sheep killed in one day very recently, but the incinerator whilst able to cope could not deal with wet cuts and the many bones resulting. The Official Veterinary Service and the Meat Hygiene Inspector had both

given their approval to the scheme, also the Licence to dump material in the sea had been granted by ExCo for a temporary period covering this season and that following until June 2005. Members resolved to grant temporary planning permission for the same period and with similar conditions as imposed on the Licence.

A letter of objection was also considered when members were reviewing the application by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office to build a two-storey house on the Old BFFI Site, but as this was in respect of an amendment to an earlier approved building scheme members were happy to grant plan-

ning permission

Ian Stewart Construction had submitted an outline application for the erection of three retail units on Plot 11 (opposite Choice Fruits) Lookout Industrial Estate. An earlier submission had been approved subject to off-street parking being provided on the site, but since then a new car park had recently been built adjacent to K3's retail shop Whilst members thought this might be a suitable alternative, they asked that the applicant be requested to demonstrate there was sufficient parking and resolved to grant permission in principle subject to that and standard outline conditions.

There was just one application deferred. Robin Fryatt's proposal for permission in principle for the erection of a television studio and office facility at Gordon Lines contained insufficient information and members agreed there was no alternative at present but to defer consideration.

Of the twelve applications for building permits reported on by the Building Adviser. Jim Robison, four were to be deferred due to current absence of sufficient information but this was expected to arrive soon

There were three applications for Off-Street Parking Grants, on sites located at 2 Pioneer Row, 29 Fitzroy Road and 64 Davis Street, and all were approved

Antony Lancaster then asked members to review his report on the Planning (Amendment) Bill 2003 and to endorse his recommendations that it progress to LegCo, also to agree to the inclusion of measures within the second stage of legislative review. These were for the provision for the designation of Tree Preservation and an amendment of neighbour notification requirements to reflect more accurately existing practices

He then reported on a number of variations from planning approvals which had either occurred or were to if agreed by members, and asked if the Committee wished this practice to continue. Members felt it should as there could be cases where they had local knowledge perhaps not available to officers and this could influence decisions.

The date of the next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, May 6, commencing at 9am, to be held in the Liberation Room at the Secretariat.

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General Practice

with Speech and Language Therapist Leslie Cheriman

Why speech and language therapists work in teams

IT HAS always been important for speech and language therapists to work in teams but it is now expected that we work not only with other speech and language therapists but with members of other professions, especially with teachers in schools.

It is important to work in teams so that we can gather extra information about the adults and children that we work with, which will help us with our therapy and support the work of other team workers.

It will also give us a view of the whole person and how they communicate within their family or at school rather than just about their speech, language or communication in one room in the hospital clinic.

The people we might work with begin with the parents or carers of a child or the spouse, children, parents or carers of an adult. With very young children we might work with health visitors, who are often the people who refer the children to us at first, following their own or parental concerns. We often refer to audiologists if we have concerns about the child's hearing and then we wait to receive information from them before treatment

With adults of course we also work with the audiologists. In a hospital or rehabilitation centre we would work with physiotherapists, occupational therapists, music and art therapists if they are available, nurses, doctors etc.

In a nursery or school we would work with teachers, learning support assistants (who support children with special educational needs in the classroom) and special needs co-ordinators. We would also talk to educational psychologists on their visits to school. So we work with a lot of people who have very long job titles!

Parents

We always like parents or carers to come to our sessions. That is because we know that they are important to the child and have a lot of information that can help us.

To communicate needs a topic of interest. So if we know that a

child likes his pet dog we might use pictures of the dog to talk about or look at a story book of a dog. If we know they are interested in building we would bring Lego or building blocks. If we know they like dolls we would get out our doll and tea set to play with.

Using the child's interests is a lot more motivating for them and we can link in our work and build on that. We can also learn how the child communicates within the family and whether the child has the maximum opportunities and talking time or whether one of his siblings does everything for him without him having to ask for it.

As the parent watches us we explain what we are doing and why and then we give simple ideas to take home and work with.

The work needs to be carried on at home as the child spends more time at home than at the hospital clinic so there is more chance to be effective if certain small tasks are continued there and linked to everyday life.

Hospital Staff

Sue Wilks will also work with the staff at the King Edward Memorial Hospital. People can be very disorientated and ill, for example after a stroke, so we hope to make communication easier and less stressful for them.

If we had to use a programme, which included picture symbols for someone who had difficulty understanding single word instructions we could then teach other professionals and the main carers about the symbols.

We would also talk to nursing or other staff to agree which symbols would be most useful. They might need a symbol to show the adult that they were going to give an injection or that they were going to give the person a wash.

Similarly if one of the adults had difficulties understanding instructions we could offer solutions and explain how to make sentences shorter and keep words simple. (often people do not think about the actual language they use in instructions or when they are having a

conversation because they don't need to.

However when you are in a situation with a person who has had a stroke, for example, or a child who does not understand you need to consider more what you are saying).

Some people use a lot of idioms in their language such as 'I'm broke' or 'I feel down today'.

These can be difficult to understand as their meaning is completely different from what they describe. The idiom' To spill the beans' is not about spilling a can of baked beans! As you can see everybody communicates all the time so it is important that staff are involved.

Teachers

Working in schools is also a good idea. I am happy to say that therapists have been working in schools for some time in the Falkland Islands.

The UK is now trying to encourage therapists and teachers to work together in schools as team working is more effective.

Therapists also get to see the child in a range of different situations where they communicate such as in the classroom, the playground or in the library.

In a school there are different ways that a therapist would work. These might be withdrawing for some individual or group work, which targets specific skills such as speech, understanding certain language concepts or understanding of meaning in texts.

This would then be linked to some of the work that is being carried out in the classroom as, like with parents at home, our work needs to be continued outside of our own therapy room.

Other ways of working would be to work with the learning support assistants to develop programmes for the children, which can be used when the therapist is not there.

This involves having the assistant observe the therapist's sessions and after working alone with the

child to feed back to the therapist any problems. This helps the assistant when they support in the classroom to pick out what difficulties the child is having.

Another way of working would be in the classroom with the teacher to explain concepts that children find difficult during the lesson. Language is important throughout the school curriculum and each subject has its particular difficulties with language.

For example, maths requires a knowledge of concepts such as add, subtract, divide etc and also words which mean the same such as more, take away and split into. It may need an understanding of pie charts, bar charts etc as well as an ability to sequence various mathematical rules to reach the answer.

History has many words which talk about time and requires the sequencing of events which can be confusing for a child who cannot accurately sequence even days of the week.

Sometimes it can just be a matter of making work more visual for a child who responds better to visual methods such as clear, simple posters on the wall, detailing what happened in a particular time in history with pictures of what happened. Or using different methods to set out information rather than a large page of writing which is harder to remember. Or preteaching of the basic concepts and vocabulary may be needed. We also try to involve the parents as linking the work to home life continues to be vital.

All team work needs a lot of feedback between team members so that we are all playing the same game.

With successful teamwork the person who benefits the most will be the person we are trying to help but on the way it will also be a good learning experience for all the members of the team as they share information and bounce ideas off each other.

In all the above settings team work will always be very very important.











Wool market report for week ending March 26 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GENERAL OVERVIEW

Greasy wool markets in Australia and South Africa reacted badly to volatility in the world's currency exchange rates during the week and lost considerable value for their respective "local" farmers. However, when closing values are expressed in terms of pence per kilogram clean, it can be seen that markets did not deviate much during the week in the micron range of importance to the Falkland Islands.

As shown in the attached "Mi-cron Price Guide", greasy wool prices slipped for fleece wool lots between 20 and 24 micron, but were generally steady for most other micron categories relevant to Falkland Is-

lands wool

It is also interesting to note that the South African market continued to operate at levels significantly higher than Australian markets for good quality "choice fleece" wool lots between 21 and 25 micron (premiums of between 6 and 16 p/kg clean existed)

It will be of extreme interest to the Falkland Islands wool economy how wool markets trade over the next two weeks (no auctions due to the Easter selling recess) and of even greater relevance, how they trade over the couple of weeks after sell-

ing resumes1

British Quotations for Tops. British top quotations, once again, took a slightly more pessimistic view of the wool market and slipped by a few pence per kilogram for most categories. As shown be-

World Markets.

In Australia, of the 84,163 bales offered to the trade, 66,761 bales were actually sold, with a pass-in rate of 20.4%. In addition to the increased pass-in rate, a further 6,000 bales were removed from sale before the commencement of selling

Included in the offering were 6,477 bales of crossbred wool, of which 5,656 bales were sold (pass-in rate 12 1%).

A similar situation was observed in South Africa. Many woolgrowers withdrew a considerable portion of their wool prior to the commencement of selling, while others passed wool in during the sale. In South Africa, of the 10,686 bales offered, 94% changed hands

No sales were reported from New Zealand during the week



Argentina gas prices up 40%

reached over the weekend with the Argentine government, natural gas producers will be allowed to increase wholesale prices by 40% as long as they guarantee full supply to domestic consumers until 2007.

The agreement that mitigates potential risks of supply shortages means Argentine natural gas producers will be supplying 80 million cubic metres per day to the domestic market, said a source from the Argentine Energy Secretariat.

"And if demand expands they will also cover that." added the source who indicated that in exchange for that assurance wholesale prices will increase 40%, a cost that will have to be absorbed by big companies and industry, but not by residential consumers

"This is a major agreement since it guarantees the provision of natural gas for the coming three years and includes a specific commitment to invest in exploring for additional supplie," said Cabinet Chief Alberto Fernández

Argentina faces this coming winter it's most severe energy crisis in fifteen years because public utility rates have been frozen for the last two years, seriously limiting investments, and because demand has out-stripped supply following the strong rebound of the Argentine economy after four years of recession.

A drought that drained water from most hydroelectric plants that generates half the country's energy, also contributed to the extreme sce-

Argentina has the lowest natural gas prices in the world (in US dollars) because of the freezing of prices and the January 2002 strong devaluation of the currency.

The shortage of natural gas forced the Argentine government to limit surplus natural gas exports until September and in accordance with consumption averages of last year.

The new scale of prices will begin to be publicly discussed late this month and early May, and they will represent an additional 15 to 25% for industrial consumers.

The three companies that signed the agreement are YPF-Repsol; Total and Petrobras, all foreign undertakings that dominate the Argentine natural gas market.

Meanwhile Argentina was forced to import electricity from Brazil. cut by 20% the supply to thirty major industries that have turned to more costly fuel generators

Surplus export cuts hit Chile since Argentina supplies 90% of its total natural gas demand. Three main thermoelectric plants in the north of Chile are facing a 10 5% reduction in Argentine natural gas provi-

MEXICAN government owned oil corporation Pemex is planning to drill its first deepwater well this year to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the first well drilled in San Luis de Potosi making Mexico one of the world's leading produc-

A century after the start of the oil industry in Mexico, production last year reached 3.37 million barrels per day (bpd), the highest ever in Pemex's history and "an unimaginable figure a century ago" said Mr.

Crude exports last year totalled 1 86 million bpd, or 145,000 bpd above 2002 levels, and natural gas production reached 4.5 billion cubic feet





Scores flock to see giant squid

The squid attracted scores of people to FIPASS on Wednesday when it was brought out of the freezer and placed on display for a few hours.

The animal's body is 2.1m long, although with its tentacles unfurled scientists believe its overall length could be nearer to 10 metres. The squid weighs approximately 200 kilos.

The British National History Museum has shown an interest in preserving the squid.

The government spokesperson said Mr Keenleyside's appointment has been made against a diffi-

cult financial background. "It has enabled the senior management structure of the department to be reviewed in the light of shrinking budgets.

"The post of Deputy Director

is to be removed producing a total saving of around £80,000 per annum as a consequence of removal of the post and making a local, as opposed to an overseas appointment.

Chairman of Standing Finance Committee, Councillor Mike Summers explained the £80,000 saving.

He said, "In addition to saving the salary of the post of Deputy Director, there are a number of savings from not recruiting abroad, but they will inevitably be an estimate since it depends on the circumstances of the appointee."

Councillor Roger Edwards, who holds the Public Works portfolio welcomed Mr Keenleyside's appointment.

He said, "Manfred has done a very good job as Deputy and, over the last five months, has shown that he would make an excellent Director.

"I am delighted that he has been appointed and look forward to working with him."

Tough budgeting to follow illex closure

IN THE wake of the early closure of the illex season, government heads have until the end of this week to determine the effect a five per cent budget cut would have on their services

Next week the Chief Executive. Chris Simpkins. Standing Finance Committee (SFC) chairman Mike Summers and Financial Secretary Derek Howatt will meet to consider the proposals from each department.

They will then put together what is expected to be a tough budget package to go before SFC at the end of this month. F/BS

He will not live on the island, but says he will visit when he is needed for trials.



I've witnessed friends turning pale and sweaty with the realisation that, yet again, a holiday is imminent and they must find new and exciting ways to entertain their children.

But despite the stress they may evoke, holidays are essential; children and teachers need to rest and recharge their batteries and it gives families time together.

And so I was heartened to hear of a questionnaire produced by school managers to ask parents their views on how they feel school holidays should

be scheduled.

We all remember the upset caused only two years ago when the idea of altering the school year to better work in with GCSEs was mooted. A number of parents were outraged that their child would have to cram a year's work into a term and many were suspicious the traditional Christmas holiday would be sacrificed. So it's great parents are being asked how they believe the Christmas holiday should run

The general feeling seems to be that the holiday should begin closer to Christmas and last for longer into January. This is a great idea, as the weather

is generally much better in January

But when finalising the details. I would urge school managers to bear in

mind the needs of not only parents but teachers too.

Around 40% of our teachers are recruited from overseas on contract and I think it's fair that they should realistically expect to be able to return home for Christmas.

Speaking with an insider in the department this week. I was reassured that teachers are not motivated to apply for a job here according to their holidays but we have to face facts.

The Islands do not offer an outstanding deal to contracted teachers - the pay isn't wonderful and most are motivated to work here for the Falklands Experience, not the perks.

The Experience is all very well, but I do think that allowing teachers time to get home for Christmas would be a gracious move which could only help to lift morale.


By no means do I believe the school year should be made to measure purely around the desires of contracted teachers but their satisfaction is important.

In a community of such a transient nature, with new faces constantly

coming and going, continuity should be embraced.

In order to encourage teachers to commit to the Falklands, away from family and friends, it would be a positive move to allow them time to get home for Christmas

Here's hoping the school managers can find a happy medium.

Last Friday, April 9, 115 guests gathered at Malvina House Hotel to help Stanley House Head of Hostel Lorraine McGill celebrate her retirement

Former residents and staff of Stanley House and a number of Lorraine's colleagues from within the Education Department travelled the length and breadth of the Islands to mark the occasion and to show their appreciation of her efforts over the vears.

Lorraine described the party as "brilliant". She said, "It was excellent to see so many of our old boarders and my colleagues I've worked with over the years.

She said she was "particularly touched" that Justin and Keith Knight flew in to Stanley from Fox Bay for the party.

Lorraine worked at Stanley House for 21 years. When she first arrived at the hostel the building had just been handed over by the military authorities following the Falklands War and was in need of care.

Public Jetty to be designated secure zone

THE Public Jetty will become a secure area for the cruise ship season. in a move to raise the necessary standard of port security.

At an end-of-season round up meeting held on Thursday, April 8. Tourism Manager John Fowler told tour operators there is a need to be able to examine passengers going back on board cruise ships.

He said that instead of making the whole area around the Jetty Centre a secure zone, it was decided to only use the Public Jetty itself.

He said pontoons will continue to be used for arriving passengers from cruise ships: departing passengers will have to be checked through the public jetty.

Mr Fowler said, in the current in-

ternational climate, the extra security measures are expected by cruise operators.

He added that a positive by-product of the secure area will be windbreaks to be built on the jetty.

More delays for St Helena air access

ATTEMPTS to develop air access to St Helena as part of a cross linked package of private sector investment in which air access would be part funded by proceeds from other private development have been discontinued.

Air Access Project Coordinator, Sharon Wainwright informed the people of St Helena of the decision on Wednesday and explained the background to the decision.

Ms Wainwright said, "Since the mid 1960's, St Helena economy has faced difficult challenges, efforts to stimulate economic activity have faltered, largely due to our isolation and limited accessibility."

Over the last 25 years the UK Government has invested upwards of £250 million in the island, yet the economy has steadily declined. In line with the economy the islands population has also declined by around 30% from 5600 to 3900.

In 2002 the people of St Helena were asked in a referendum whether the government should pursue the development of air access to the island. 71.6% expressed a preference for the construction of an airport on St Helena with alternative com-

mercial arrangements made for ship-

In recognition of this the UK Government agreed to commit up to £26.3 million to the development of air access if an acceptable proposal could be developed that would finance the balance of the cost.

In 2003 an international invitation was issued to determine the level of interest among private investors in the construction and operation of an airport for St Helena.

Four responses were received from the St Helena Leisure Company (SHELCO), Basil Read, Lagan Holdings and John Laing International

Ms Wainwright said Atkins Management Consultants, "...a reputable UK consultancy firm with extensive experience in public private ventures," were engaged, "... to go through the four responses and give advice on whether any or all of them might provide a basis for entering into negotiations with a private sector company to develop air access."

Ms Wainwright explained. "It has taken rather longer than anticipated to complete our assessment of the expressions of interest and outline proposals," adding, "...this is because we needed to be as sure as we could about the financial judgments being made."

However Ms Wainwight says the decision to abandon the concept of developing air access for St Helena as part of a cross linked package does not mean, "...that we have given up looking for ways in which to provide air access to St Helena."

Ms Wainwright assured the St Helenian people that the UK Government remains committed to maintaining access to the island after the ship RMS St Helena reaches the end of its useful working life, "...and recognises your preference for development of air access."

Work will continue with the UK Government over the coming months to explore ways of providing air access to the island.

Ms Wainwright said the work undertaken now will look at all the costs and the long term benefits to ensure that, "...when a decision is reached it will be the right one for the St Helena and UK Governments.

"Throughout the work we propose to consult you and keep you informed of what is going on."

News in brief

Irizar explanation not satisfactory

THE GOVERNOR has indicated that the Argentine government's official version of the Almirante Irizar incident does not satisfy either the British or Falklands governments, and it is likely that a more detailed explanation will be sought from Buenos Aires.

Speaking on the Falklands Islands Broadcasting Station on Monday, His Excellency the Governor Mr Howard Pearce said. "The response doesn't really add very much to what the Argentine Government have said in the past-so in that sense it is not entirely satisfactory.

"We will be considering what the next steps, if any, should be taken, over the next few days with the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in London.

"I will be keeping councillors fully in touch through discussions and decisions on what action to take in this government to government dialogue, for the government in London to take.

in London to take.
"They will want to keep councillors fully informed and I will be doing that during the course of this week as discussions proceed." MP

New housing development planned for West Stanley

A NEW housing development plan for West Stanley has been created for an area known as South Sappers Hill

The plan drawn up by Gwyn Thompson at the Planning Office was examined at the Public Works Department Committee meeting on April 2


The proposal is made up of a basic grid pattern with a main spine road winding its way through the development area, the spine road will be a clearway.

The questioner uses the expression "Camp tracks". In my view Camp tracks of the traditional kind are never highways maintainable at the public expense, with the result that the Government has no obligation to maintain them. However, I believe your correspondent may have in mind the roads in Camp which the Government has constructed as part of its road construction programme

These in my view are highways maintainable at the public expense under section 36(2)(a) of the Highways Act 1980. (This provision states that a highway constructed by a highway authority, otherwise than on behalf of some other person who is not a highway authority, is a "highway maintainable at the public expense". In the Falkland Islands, the Government is the highway authority) "Highway" has its common law meaning ("highway" is not defined in the Act) and the roads the Government has constructed as part of its road programme are, in my view, "highways" at common law because the public as such has the right to go to and fro over them with vehicles. on foot, on horseback or with animals such as sheep, without asking for permission from any person. (By the way, whether a not a road has been designated under the Road Traffic Ordinance as one to which the Ordinance applies is irrelevant as to whether or not it is a highway maintainable at the public expense)

Where a highway in the Falkland Islands is maintainable at the public expense the Government has a duty to maintain it If a person believes that a "way" (e.g. a road) is a highway maintainable at the public expense (i.e. by the Government) and that it is out of repair, under section 56(1) of the Highways Act 1980 he may serve a notice on the Government requiring it to state whether it admits that the road is a highway and that it is liable to main-

The Government then has a month to reply by notice to the person who served the notice upon it admitting that the road is a highway and that it is liable to maintain it

If the Government does not within one month reply to the notice by admitting that the road is a highway and that it is liable to maintain it, the person who served the notice can apply to the Magistrate's Court under section 56(2) of the Act for a finding that the road is a highway maintainable by the Govern-ment, and if the court finds the road is out of repair, an order "to put it into proper repair within such reasonable period as may be specified in the order"

If the Government docs reply to the notice admitting that the road is a highway which it is liable to repair, the person who served the notice may within six months apply to the Magistrate's Court under section 56(4) for an order requiring the Government to put the highway into proper repair, if the court finds that the highway is not in proper repair If the Government fails to com-

ply with an order under section 56(2) or (4) to put a highway into proper repair, the person who served the notice can apply to the court for an order authorising him to carry out the repair works and recover the cost from the Government

Legislate and enforce to save lives

I APPLAUD councillors' decision to make seatbelts compulsory for children, but I am sorry that the job has not been finished.

It makes no sense to exclude adults from seatbelt legislation on non-designated roads and in Stanley

I have heard it claimed that accidents are different here and seatbelts don't help. This is nonsense. Although accidents in the Falklands tend to be single vehicles, which often roll, we know that seatbelts are very effective in these situations, even if the roof crushes in

Rolls are known to be a dangerous type of accident, and you are 25 times more likely to be injured if thrown from a vehicle rather than being belted in place. Analysis of local accidents confirms what is known from research in the UK and USA.

Regarding Stanley, we know that most accidents occur close to

home or work, and that seatbelts are most effective at relatively low speeds. We should be belting up every trip.

Civil liberty? The law doesn't allow us to travel without functioning brakes either, but no one's protesting about that.

The current three-point seatbelt when used properly has been shown to reduce fatalities by 65-70% and produce a 10-fold reduction in serious injury. "The greatest failure of the device is the occupant's refusal to use the system".

Legislation will only be effective if it is enforced. We're human, and most of us don't wear seatbelts unless we're made to. It's a waste of time to argue about whether the state or the individual should take responsibility.

Legislation and enforcement would save lives.



Falklands Conservation looks back over the summer season in this, its twenty-fifth year

THE summer of 2003-4 has been a busy and eventful one for Falklands Conservation.

The local charity celebrates its 25th Anniversary this year and a wide series of events and schemes have been planned to commemorate this:

The Conservation Small Grants Scheme was established in January to encourage people to undertake environmental projects funded by FC. This is using money bequeathed to the charity by the late Mrs Joan Kenneally

 The Lyn Blake Award is also to be established this year, to encourage the Watch group onto West Falkland and teach them about the life. traditions and environment of the west. The first trip will be undertaken in October and will visit Hawk's Nest Ponds.

 Members meetings are to be regularly held every quarter, to encourage feedback and ideas directly from the local members of Falklands Conservation All members are welcome and we look forward to seeing you there. Later in the year we hope to extend these meetings to West Falkland to encourage west members to participate as well.

Through the course of the summer, many events have been held, beginning with the Ball at the end of September 2003. This popular event raised over £8.500 for Falklands Conservation and helps to provide core support for research projects and the Watch Group.

More recently, the Campers Bash at Fitzroy proved a great success. with over 100 people attending and a great variety of entertainment. fine food laid on and some traditional

The Polar Bear Walk in October was another great day out for many local families. There was a fantastic turn out of over 200 people and most of these were sponsored to raise money for the World Wildlife Fund.

The final figure was over £2660, the second highest figure raised for the campaign by any single group.

During December, an enthusiastic turn out from both the local and military communities helped to clean up the Moody Brook area, making the streams, ditches and open comp areas safer for wild and domestic animals. Vast amounts of old fences, sleepers and other heavy rubbish were taken away and many thanks to all who helped on the day.

The Islands' participation in the John Ridgway 'Save the Albatross' voyage has put the Falklands on the map for many people. The involvement in this historic and worldwide mission has included the trip being joined by Tim Reid of the Seabirds at Sea Team and a international raising of awareness of the problems that our seabirds face

In terms of research and scientific work being carried out, the range of projects that Falklands Conservation is involved in continues to grow A recent grant from the UK government has assured the future for two years of the Seabirds at Sea Team, working hard to prevent the steady decline of albatrosses and petrels around the

Adoption by the Falkland Islands Government of the National Plans of Action will further help this cause, as does the UK government ratifying the Agreement on the Conservation of Albatrosses and Petrels, an international agreement to protect these

This year was the first year that research work was undertaken using the new research station on Steeple Jason. This new site will allow essential monitoring work to be carried out and regular counts to be made of this important seabird site. Work there this summer highlighted yet another dramatic decline, with albatross numbers down from 156.000 to only 112,000 breeding pairs and

Rockhopper numbers down from 89,000 to 35,000 breeding pairs.

The work on the invertebrates of the Falklands continues, with Dr Alex Jones and his assistant and wife. Michelle, undertaking a further six weeks study in the Islands this summer After weeks in the field, notably around the Hill Cove area, there are thousands of new insects to be identified and Alex is currently in the UK carrying this out. The new Guide to Insects of the Falkland Islands will be published later this year.

The work on Falklands plants continues, with a recent visit by Steve Alton of the Millennium Seed Bank helping to establish the collection of Falklands seeds. Eventually this will be held for posterity with the Falklands Herbarium, as a safeguard against losing these species in the

The keen young members of the WATCH Group have also been extremely busy.

In October the season began with 14 members heading off to Sea Lion Island, where as well as watching Elephant Seals and Killer Whales they carried out a beach clean.

Another 14 members of the WATCH Group also went to Shallow Harbour where they carried out another beach clean. In November the group also had a beach clean at Whalebone Cove along with an exciting art day lead by artist Penelope Johnson.

The WATCH Group have been looking at the effects of marine debris and how it effects the local environment and wildlife. Their campaign has been so successful that they were noticed by the BBC Newsround feam in the UK.

Newsround were so impressed with how much they cared about their slands and the wildlife that presenter. Lizzie Greenwood, interviewed lembers of the WATCH group on her way down to Antarctica in early December. In February this year

Lizzie's piece on global warming was shown on Newsround along with the WATCH groups interviews

In early January WATCH Group members flew out to Port Stephens at the invitation of Diane Towersey and Paul Robertson, where they camped for two nights. The group took part in adventure games and quizzes with bird watching and nature walks

Another group set off to Long Island Farm in February courtesy of Neil and Glenda Watson, Dr Alex Jones and Michelle accompanied the WATCH Group on this trip to share their knowledge of invertebrates. There were more games and even the chance to go swimming as the weather was so good, even the adults went for a dip too!

On February 21 the whole group went to Elephant Beach Farm on their annual camp. The weekend was packed with activities including sensory games devised by Alistair Lavery the spider specialist and a trip to Elephant Beach where the group learned more about whale strandings. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed themselves thanks to Violet Clarke and Ben Berntsen's hospitality.

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



Studying and preparing for exams

WORRY and stress - friend or foe?

At this time of year, a lot of young people are faced with the task of studying and preparing for exams. Pre-study stress and worry about exams are common and are often part of the necessary build up of pressure that helps to motivate us into tackling the tasks ahead.

Sometimes though, stress can build up to the extent that we feel overwhelmed by the tasks ahead and this can leave us feeling stuck and frustrated

The frustration, excessive worry and lack of making progress can lead to us feeling incapable of effective study and we may then begin to feel undermined when our self-confidence decreases. In this situation, the studying often gets put back to another day or another week and a cycle of avoidance may emerge.

What to do if you are avoiding tackling studying and preparing for exams: the aim of the techniques discussed in this article are to break the cycle of worry, stress and avoidance.

We can learn how to break the cycle by becoming more aware of our study habits and our attitudes towards studying. By identifying the problem areas and tackling them one at a time the cycle will change.

- Make use of the help and guidance that is around you. This may be the first time or only the second time that you have had to tackle exams. Your teachers have helped students through exams many times before, use their advice and learn from their experience.
- Ask your family and friends for support. Life may have to change for a while when you are studying, knowing that those closest to you understand what you are facing can reduce the pressures on you and provide a great deal of support.
- The law of mass effect the more you do, the more you learn. If you study for long hours in an inefficient manner, you will achieve less: that is true, but the myth that if you lean to study incredibly ef-



ficiently you can learn a lot by doing very little is false. You have to put the work in to achieve the results. What that amount of work is will vary from student to student.

- Making it easy to start. Most people get into a phase like a kind of 'no man's land', neither working nor relaxing, just thinking about the work to be done. This may involve flicking through books or notes or stopping for a cup of tea and time passes by. This is when the guilt trip can kick in and the guilt in turn creates worry. Allow time for this phase, but limit the amount of time you spend in this phase, break the cycle.
- Create a good working environment. Try to get rid of any clutter or distractions as this can be very off putting. If you can't see the wood for the trees, or your notes and books for the TV. play station, magazines, CDs etc. then clear some space. Plus, make sure your room is warm, as when we sit for any length of period our bodies cool down quickly. At the same time, make sure the room is well ventilated as we can get drowsy quickly in a stuffy room.
- List the tasks beforehand Writing down the tasks to be completed beforehand helps us to prioritise the work to be undertaken.
- Keep the benefits of study clearly in mind. Consider why am I doing this? You may even write down your reasons to remind your-

self why you are undertaking this work. The aim is to stay focused

- Leave the work environment prepared for the next study session. This is based on the theory that clutter and mess will put us off returning to study the next day. So clearing up after a study session can help prepare for the next day.
- Make the most of the best time of day. If you have the choice, consider when you work best. Morning, afternoon or evening? Try to accommodate your preferences. Parents and guardians, please be tolerant and try to support the study pattern.
- Study for short periods. There is no rule of thumb. What suits one person might not suit another. If you are studying for the first time you could try a study session of between 40 minutes and one hour.
- Cut big projects down into smaller manageable slices. Like learning to read a book, you start at the beginning, reading chapter by chapter without worrying about the other chapters. Studying is similar. The whole is the sum of smaller parts. So breaking the work down into smaller portions will help you stay focused.
- File work for easy access. Adopt a system for your notes so you don't waste time trying to retrieve information. This doesn't have to be an elaborate filing system. Use the PC if you have time, but a folder, file or even an old box for storing and retrieving notes would do
- Reward yourself. Build in rewards for your efforts, things that you can do and enjoy after a study session Please be realistic though, ie watching a movie, seeing your friends or cooking a nice meal is okay. Expecting treats you can't afford will lead to you feeling worse about yourself, ie buying new clothes, CDs, games or expecting parents to buy them. Or if food is seen as the only treat, finding yourself binge eating then regretting it later.

Growing concern in Galicia with lack of squid

THE SOUID crisis in Falkland Islands' waters will have a direct affect on the Galician fleet operating in the region as well as have a great impact for the Galician industry since the region is a net importer of squid from the South Atlantic, fishing news agensy FIS reports

According to site the latest information is that, "...Illex squid catches in the South Atlantic have plummeted: in 2003 little more than 238,000 tonnes were caught against the almost 610,000 tonnes of 1999. So far this year, catches have barely reached 29,700 tonnes, indicate statistics provided by Argentine and Falklands governments

The site says, "The critical situation has lead Falkland's authorities to announce an early closure for the squid season beginning April 14. A similar decision is expected from Argentina any moment regarding activities to the south of 44°S parallel, according to statements by Gerardo Nieto, Argentine Fisheries Undersecretary

Official records show that during the first three months of 2004 the Argentine fleet caught just above 28.200 tonnes of squid, a significant drop from the 95,400 tonnes caught during the same period of 2003

The situation is not different in the Falklands where during the first quarter of 2004 only 1.500 tons or 10% of the catch average of recent years was extracted, when catches usually reach 150,000

FIS reports the closure of the fishing season in the Falklands' waters will have a direct impact on 14 Galician vessels and 560 crewmembers

"However and according to the president of Community Companies in Fishing Joint Ventures Association (ACEMIX). José Puerta Prado, the deep sea Galician fleet will remain in the area fishing with licenses for finfish and other species of lesser commercial value. (FIS/MP)

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Stanley and Tri-services draw

By Patrick Watts STANLEY threw away a two goal advantage and had to settle for a 2-2 draw in the first game of an anticipated five match series against the best of the British Forces.

After non-stop rain on the previous two days, the field was very slippy and players found it difficult to control the ball as it whipped off the wet surface. Aldridge hit the ball into an empty net to put Stanley 2-0 in front Further chances came the way of Aldridge but unfortunately he squandered two excellent opportunties, firing the ball wide of the goal.

However the visitors hit back and started opening up the Stanley defence with some crisp passing and movement. On 60 minutes they pulled a goal back when Mike Budd was left unmarked in front of goal after a Stanley defensive slip, and he gratefully slammed the ball into the net.

Stanley Manager Chris Clarke brought on Moyce for Joshua in an attempt to bolster a suddenly shaky defence, but soon after Stanley were pegged back to 2-2 when Mark Pressley was left on his own in front of goal after confusion on the Stanley left. He made no mistake when presented with a golden opprtunity and celebrated his goal with considerable enthusi-

The Tri Services looked more likely to score as the match progressed and Gilbert had to be at his best to deal with a couple of dangerous looking efforts

Argentina abstains, Chile condemns

ARGENTINE Foreign Affairs Minister Rafael Bielsa told Congress this Wednesday that Argentina will abstain from voting in the United Nations on the controversial issue of human rights in Cuba because "we're convinced" that condemning. ...will not contribute materially to improve human rights in the island.

Mr Bielsa added that this year's Argentine abstention. "...has nothing to do with favouring Cuba. it's an absolutely rational decision. and claimed that Cuba is not the only country in America. ...that does not respect human rights.

The annual UN vote on human rights in Cuba usually splits Latinamerica and this year is no different. Chile. Guatemala and Costa Rica have anticipated they will condemn Cuba, while Argentina will abstain and Mexico and Brazil have decided not to anticipate their vote The US sponsored project to be considered this week in Geneva will be presented by Honduras with the support of El Salvador, Nicaragua, Peru. Australia and Czech Řepublic.

Honduran president Roberto Maduro was publicly criticized by Cuban president Fidel Castro for what he described as "servility

The Chilean government of Socialist president Ricardo Lagos for the last three years has voted against Cuba, and this year failed in an attempt to agree a common position with Brazil and Argentina.

Meantime in Mexico the press revealed that President Vicente Fox received a personal call from President George Bush and although no details were made public there's strong speculation that the coming Cuban human rights vote figured in the agenda

MERCOPRESS Argentine squid fishery closes early

ARGENTINE fishery authorities decided to ban illex squid fishing south of parallel 44°S because of exceptionally poor catches.

The decision was made official on Wednesday with the publication in the Official Gazette of decree 201/3004 effective from midnight April 14. The squid season south of parallel 44 which provides 70% of all catches normally closes June 30

The decision adopted by the Argentine Under-secretary of Fisheries is based on scientific information from the National Institute of Fisheries Research and Development (INIDEP)

The early closure of the fishery in southern Patagonia was recommended when catches continued to be particularly low According to official figures during the first three months of the year the Argentine jugger fleet extracted little over 28,200 tonnes of squid. This is significantly less than the volume caught in the same period last year which totalled 95,400 tons

"Squid is an annual species, whose behaviour is erratic and demands precautionary measures. The fishery ban south of parallel 44 was implemented with the purpose of preserving the species and guaranteeing continued activity. said Fisheries Under-secretary Gerardo Nieto to Telam

It will certainly affect the fishing effort, but it's preferable to implement precautionary suspensions, than suffer the resource's extinction," he emphasised.

This is the third consecutive year that the Argentine government is forced to anticipate the closure of the squid season because of cephalopod's scarcity

59,638 cruise visitors in Uruguay

WITH the departure of Delphin Renaissance which called in to Punta del Este and Montevideo on March 17, the 2003/2004 cruise season in Uruguay came to an end

The season officially began when Queen Elizabeth 2 called in Montevideo on November 6.

The season totalled 63 calls by 26 different cruise vessels with 59,638 visitors, an encouraging 12% increase over the last season with 52.917 visitors

Kirchner spends Easter holiday in hospital

ARGENTINE President Nestor Kirchner appeared in public this Tuesday for the first time in six days after having been hospitalized in Rio Gallegos, suffering from a gastric haemorrhage

Mr Kirchner is suffering from a

severe crosive gastroduodenitis (bleeding ulcer) initiated by a counter inflammatory drug prescribed for a dentistry problem which caused internal bleeding and forced his immediate hospitalisation during Easter week

Nurse jailed for drug theft

A STAFF nurse who stole pethidine, a Class A drug, from the hospital has been sent to prison for nine months.

Fourteen members of staff from the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital watched as Denise Schophaus, a South African nurse who worked on contract in the Falklands, was led away from court yesterday to began her thirty-four week sentence.

She had pleaded guilty to three charges of theft of pethidine, a Class A drug, and four of forging entries in a drugs register. Ms Schophaus had maintained her innocence until Monday, the day listed for her trial, when she changed her pleas to guilty.

She faced one additional charge of the theft of paracetamol to which she pleaded guilty from the outset.

Mr Brian Cummings, a barrister who travelled from the United Kingdom for the case, presented the prosecution's facts to Senior Magistrate, Mr Nick Sanders He said the offences committed by Schophaus had taken place on two separate occasions.

The first occurred on August 14, 2003. The defendant accompanied Dr Richard Davies to attend to an injured fisherman aboard a vessel in Port William.

Acting upon the doctor's instruction, Schophaus removed two 100 millilitre ampoules of pethidine from the controlled drugs cabinet.

The patient was administered one ampoule of pethidine; he was later admitted to the hospital where he had surgery before being admitted to the ward. The second ampoule of pethidine was not returned to the controlled drugs cabinet, a requirement under hospital regulations

The following day, the patient was transported by ambulance to Mount Pleasant, accompanied by Ms Schophaus, to be airlifted out of the Islands.

Although the ward sister, Janice Dent, had told Ms Schophaus the patient did not require pain relief the defendant removed two ampoules of pethidine from the drugs cabinet without asking another member of staff to sign as a witness to the removal.

The following morning, she asked the ward sister to countersign the entry in the drugs register.

Mr Cummings said that at first Mrs Dent refused to countersign the entry in the register, however she later agreed, although she had misgivings.

A few days later, a senior staff nurse and the pharmacist Caroline

Richards carried out a routine check on the controlled drugs cabinet and register

Mr Cummings said Ms Richards was "struck" by entries in the register which showed two ampoules of pethidine removed on August 14 were unaccounted for. She was also troubled that two ampoules had been taken for the transfer journey to Mount Pleasant on August 15.

She relayed her concerns to the Chief Medical Officer and Ms Schophaus was suspended. An internal inquiry was held and a panel recommended the tightening of drug control procedures. Ms Schophaus was reinstated.

Mr Cummings said that on New Year's Day a patient who had suffered serious burns was treated by Dr Barry Elsby who telephoned the ward requesting pethidine. One ampoule was taken from the ward and provided to the doctor. Ms Schophaus, who was on call, arrived at the hospital at this time.

Twenty minutes later, Dr Elsby requested another ampoule of pethidine, half of which was administered to the patient.

Once again, problems were later uncovered by the pharmacist. She checked with the ward and was told

that the burns patient had only received 150 millilitres of pethidine (one and a half ampoules) on New Year's Day.

However the register showed that two further ampoules had been removed for the patient and they were unaccounted for; they had been signed for by Ms Schophaus and another member of staff.

On January 7 the Chief Nursing Officer, Mandy Heathman, outlined the facts to Ms Schophaus as she saw them and showed her the signatures in the register. The defendant alleged that someone had forged her signature.

Mrs Heathman told Ms Schophaus that if she admitted taking the drugs for herself, she would be offered help and support from the hospital. However the defendant still denied the allegations.

The police were informed and carried out a search of Ms Schophaus' home where they found paracetamol which had been prescribed to a

Defence barrister. Mr Mark Benson, who also travelled from the United Kingdom for the case, said his client had stolen goods valued at only £25.

Was speeder let off?

A NEW way to avoid speeding fines may have been discovered - not by slowing down but by booking a flight out of the Islands.

On Wednesday, April 14, officers from the Royal Falkland Islands Police carried out speed checks on the Mount Pleasant Road.

According to a *Penguin News* source, one driver, who was allegedly caught travelling at 69 miles per hour - almost thirty miles over the speed limit - was excused from prosecution by the Attorney General's Chambers as he was flying out of the Islands the following day

Penguin News contacted the Attorney General, David Lang, to see if such an exception had been made. However Mr Lang was unavailable for comment in time for our publishing deadline.

£2m+ terminal rejected

THE estimated cost of £2-3 million for the construction of a shipping terminal at New Haven has been rejected.

At a meeting of the Falkland Islands Development Board on Tuesday, General Manager Julian Morris said the Public Works Department had prepared an initial estimate of £2-3 million for the proposed jetty.

However he added that this was, "...probably not a viable option" and a staff member of the Corporation is preparing. "...an assessment of freight traffic around the islands as part of exploring other options."

Hughes replaces Christopher

DR JOHN HUGHES has been appointed as the new British Ambassador to Argentina.

He will replace Sir Robin Christopher in November 2004, when Sir Robin retires from the diplomatic service.

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

While in a Stanley store desperately seeking souvenirs to send to rellies overseas the other day. I couldn't help but overhear two men chatting about the state of the economy. One made the prediction that, "_loads of them will be packing up and leaving now, che" Although I chuckled at the time, after all, this sentiment is expressed every few years - or at least every time the economy looks a bit tight or the Argentines get a little too vocal - I realised this pessimism was the by product of years of uncertainty.

realised this pessimism was the by product of years of uncertainty.

There's no doubt about it, we live in a vulnerable little corner of the world and if the fishing does completely fold the hard times which could be ahead

will involve some level of sacrifice

So what should go?

I'm going to sound heartless now, but maybe a good start would be to attack the less fortunate. The government sets aside £100,000 a year for donations and subventions to the needy, so maybe we should now say damn

the needy, let's look after ourselves.

Or maybe Campers should be first to get it in the neck. A quick glance at the government estimates shows that over £750,000 is spent in improvements and incentive schemes (not to mention the £1 million loss that the Agricultural Department makes each year, or the £600,000 subsidy provided for coastal shipping). Should so much money continue to be dedicated to such a small percentage of the population? Personally, I believe the Falklands would be a drastically lesser place without the Camp community but is that enough reason to justify all that money?

Perhaps representation overseas should be chopped. Do we really need a dedicated government office in London with a staff of seven? It's all very well to wine and dine MPs but does the resulting political support for the

Falklands match the money spent?

Some might say the holiday credit scheme, which costs the government £600,000 a year, could go. This government account which grows by £1 a day for each adult (and 50p per child) allows travel overseas for 'cultural ventilation'. No other nation would expect its government to pay for its holidays, so should we?

No one knows if this poor squid season is a one-off or the beginning of the end for the industry. What we do know is many areas are bound to come under attack as government spending comes under ever closer scrutiny. This

questioning is not necessarily a bad thing.

After reading the report from the meeting of FIDC this week, one of the most effective ways of saving money that springs to mind is to give the Public Works Department a good kick up the backside

Two to three million pounds for a shipping terminal at New Haven? Someone in that department has got to be having a laugh.

Death of Islands' legend

FALKLANDS' legend. Harold Theodore Rowlands CBE who bestowed The Freedom of the Falklands and an unexpected big kiss on the cheek of. Margaret Thatcher in 1983 has died suddenly, aged 72.

A spokesperson for Legislative Council this week said councillors are deeply saddened by the tragte death of Harold Rowlands. "...and would like to convey their sympathy to his family and many friends."

They paid tribute to, "... the very significant and special contributions to the Falklands which he made throughout his long career in the Civil Service and on Legislative and Executive Council."

As a mark of respect, the government says flags will be flown at half mast on the day of Mr Rowlands' funeral, the date of which has yet to be announced

Harold Rowlands was born in 1931 and rose from the humble position of selling flour and sugar over the counter to customers visiting the West Store, to that of Colonial Treasurer (later titled Financial Secretary) and Commissioner for Taxation in 1972. After 40 years in Government he retired from Public Service in 1989.

Following the deportation of the Islands Governor Rex Hunt. First Secretary Michael Growcott and Chief Secretary Dick Baker by Argentine Military Forces in April 1982. Mr Rowlands became the most senior Islander remaining in the civil administration. He guided the small population through the very difficult times of 1982, and remained firm, despite frequent Argentine intimidation.

He was a third generation Islander. His grandfather. Swedish born Frank Rowlands, at the age of just 25 years, was ship wrecked on Speedwell Island in 1860, while working as a seaman. He later captained ships around the Falklands.

Nick-named Beethoven by Argentine Officers because of his heavy blonde hair and resemblance to the famous German composer. Harold Rowlands repeatedly found excuses not to open the Islands'

vaults when Colonel Chinni, the new Argentine Treasury chief, wanted to count the Colony's cash to, "...see how many pesos it represented "With the peso to pound rate then in the region of 12,000 for one pound. "Beethoven" allegedly responded by saying that he was, "...too old to start thinking about so many noughts!"

He was awarded an OBL in the New Year Honours of 1978 but the higher decoration of CBF was presented to him by Queen Elizabeth in 1988.

When he was first appointed Colonial Treasurer, the Falklands budget, which he managed, was around half a million pounds, but by 1988 it had risen to more than 30 million, mainly due to income from fishing licence revenue. He insisted that some of the new income be diverted into a reserve fund and invested. This has now risen to around 150 millions pounds.

After retiring from Government he was elected to the Legislative Council with an overwhelming majority. However after completing his four years term, he stood down in 1993 and took no further part in Falklands' politics

He began a long established rapport with British Forces of the Port Squadron soon after the Islands were liberated in 1982. A small slipway positioned on the waterfront close to his home was used day and night as troops off-loaded materials as British troops reinforced in the Islands.

He fed the soldiers and offered them accommodation in his own home over many years. On July 20, 2002 the British Forces erected a special seat on the sea-front, bearing the inscription. Harold T. Rowlands, Presented by Port Troop, "20 years of friendship." Such was his standing through-

Such was his standing throughout the Falklands that many Islanders are flying their flags at half-mast, while official Government flags will fly at half-mast on the day of his funeral.

He never married and is survived by his sister.

He described Ms Schophaus as a 'damaged person' who is "depressed and suicidal

Mr Benson said this was not a drugs case. "...in the usual sense of the words, it is a theft case." He said the items were not prohibited drugs in the usual sense and were not the type which would have found their way into the community

He advised the Senior Magistrate to treat the case, "...the same as if a staff nurse at Guy's Hospital in London did the same - no more, no less, and to avoid issuing his client with a custodial sentence.

He summarised his client's situation. "This case involves failure to confront problems. Someone who is taking drugs to use on herself is doing it because she has problems and is failing to deal with them.

After a short deliberation, the Senior Magistrate Nick Sanders said he had no option but to issue the defendant with a custodial sentence of 36 weeks. He issued no separate sentence for the theft of paraceta-

He said that in assessing the level of sentencing he had taken into account that in all but one case the drug involved was Class A. that.

the Falkland Islands are largely free of the scourge of drugs and that drug related offences are treated more seriously here than in the United Kingdom in order to preserve that status, " and, "... the drugs were stolen from the hospital by you acting in a position of trust within the hospital and that you have grossly betrayed the trust put in you as a public servant

He said he had given the defendant some credit for her guilty pleas. but not full credit as she only pleaded guilty on the first day listed for trial. He said he had seen "little evidence" of remorse. "...more regret at being

Mr Sanders made no order for costs however he expressed his concern that a handwriting expert had had to prepare a report and travel to the Islands in anticipation of a trial at a cost of approximately £7,200.

Museum dance raises over £1,000 RAF to the rescue

THE RAF Search and Rescue Team's swift action has helped to save a Peruvian fisherman's hand after he accidentally crushed it in a piston on board the Argos Pereira early Saturday morning.

Minutes after receiving a call for help, Flight Lieutenants Sparky Dunlop, Charlie Logan, Patrick Thirkell and Sergeant Mark Lean, all from 78 Squadron, were flying to the rescue of the injured man some 40 miles off the West coast of West Falkland in their Sea King helicop-

A military spokesperson said. Although weather conditions were favourable. Mark the winch man was faced with landing on a deck being tossed around by a 15 foot swell, before he could aid the fisherman who was in great pain. As well as suffering crushed fingers and splintered bone, the Peruvian sailor had lost a significant amount of blood and although his hand was already well-bandaged by the time the RAF team arrived, he needed to reach hospital with minimum delay.

As Sparky and Charlie kept the helicopter hovering above the moving vessel, Patrick, the winch operator and Mark, who is medically trained to ambulance technician standard, carefully winched the fish-erman on board. "They ensured he was in a medically stable condition and administered pain relief for the hour-long journey back to Stanley hospital. Fortunately, Mark's talents also include a knowledge of the Spanish language which allowed him to converse with the injured, 36year-old man and provide the necessary reassurance to someone suf-fering from such an painful ordeal."

Patrick said, "It was a mission that went exactly to plan. Alberto (the rescued fisherman) was a very

lucky man". His luck was to continue at the hospital as a visisting orthopaedic surgeon carried out the operation on the fisherman's hand and was able to save all his fingers.

Effective teamwork and co-operation between those involved in the rescue, as well as the quick response and bravery of the rescue team, determines the result of such an emergency situation and the professionalism of all involved was secand to none

Charlie, the co-pilot said "All the agencies we worked with were very helpful, and the job seemed to go smoothly and expeditiously." Mark, the winch man, added. "...it was a well planned and executed job which ultimately enabled the casualty's hand to be saved.'

The fisherman, who remained in hospital overnight, is now on the road to recovery and will be repatriated to Montevideo on Saturday.

Argos Group Ltd, who jointly operate the Argos Pereira with Armadora Pereira of Vigo. Spain have expressed their gratitude to the team by kindly donating £500 to the RAF Benevolent Fund

In a letter to the RAF team, they said "...without the swift response of 78 Squadron, the outcome could have been so very different. It is a great comfort to all involved within the fishing industry to have help from professionals such as your-

It is not the first time that the Search and Rescue team have been called to assist a Peruvian fisherman. Just two weeks ago, the RAF team were involved in another successful rescue mission when a man, also with serious hand injuries, was rescued from on board his fishing vessel and dashed to Stanley hospital for treat-

Two men face drink driving charges

TWO MEN appeared in court this week to face drink driving charges.

Martin Webb, an engineer on the Seabolt Condor, pleaded guilty yesterday to driving while over the legal limit.

The court heard that on Saturday, April 17, after visiting Stanley with a friend, Mr Webb was heading back to his ship at Mare Harbour when, eight miles from Mount Pleasant, the vehicle he was driving left the road.

Mr Webb was unhurt in the accident but his friend sustained whiplash. Substantial damage was caused to the front passenger side of the vehicle.

Mr Webb was arrested and driven to Stanley where he was breathalysed on the Camic Datamaster. He gave a lower reading of 65 micrograms of alcohol per 100 millilitres of breath analysed. The legal limit is 35

The Senior Magistrate. Mr Nick Sanders, fined Mr Webb £450 and ordered him to pay prosecution costs of £70. He disqualified him from driving for 15 months.

Also in court yesterday was Neil Watson who was charged with driving while over the prescribed limit.

Mr Watson was stopped by golice after they received a report that he had almost reversed into another vehicle.

He was breathalysed and his lower reading was 122mg/100ml breath.

The Senior Magistrate said the matter was too serious for him to deal with by way of a fine and requested the preparation of a pre-sentence report. The case was adjourned until May 5

Firefighters on the pull - for charity

STANLEY firefighters have boosted the Stephen Jaffray Memorial Fund after they pulled a fire engine along Stanley's front road at the weekend

Last year the Stanely Fire Brigade pulled a fully laden fire engine from Government House to the letty Centre in nine minutes. This year the service decided they would be more ambitious and set off from the Beaver Hangar at the west end of Stanley to the same finishing point.

The 'pullers' encountered two inclines, the first between the wreck of the *Jhelum* and the World War I monument and the second from the 1982 Memorial to the Post Office. However, no such problem occurred on Saturday's pull and turning some delightful shades of pinkred (and, in one case, a rather startling purple) the firefighters kept the fire engine moving over the rise until it began to run easily again.

Arriving at the Jetty Centre just





twenty nine and a half minutes after starting, and knocking four and a half minutes off their best practice time the jubilant group of firefighters were justifiably proud of their efforts

Craig Paice and Andy Brownlee, acted as cheerleaders and collected funds from passing vehicles, pedestrians and every building and pub within their range, always returning to shout encouragement at their fellow firefighters when the going got tough

Proof that everyone had indeed dug deep into their pockets. Chief Fire Officer Gardner Fiddes said that in addition to £600 in cash and £120 in cheques collected. Craig and Andy also collected a Visa card receipi dated June 2001, an allen key, screws, a small key, several earrings, two paperclips, a watch battery, thrupenny bit, 1940s penny and a camera film.

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A Falkland Islander till I die - a review of Terry Betts' autobiography

I AM one of many people in the Falklands often heard to say, (particularly after or during a rip roaring yarn about the 'good old days') people have got to write these stories down before they get lost forever.

Disappointingly, the yarns spun in Terence Betts' (right) autobiography weren't quite as controversial as I had hoped but it did make me think back to the good old days and, in my opinion, any book that stimulates thought deserves to be read

The first thing you have to do before reading this book, is get over the irony of the title. The author of A Falkland Islander till I die. now actually lives in Portugal.

Once you do, the book provides a number of well-remembered, if not necessarily well-written, tales of Falklands life.

I am a little younger than Terry so don't have memories of the 1950s and early 60s but one thing that struck me whilst reading his accounts of childhood events was the similarities with some of my carliest memories from the 1970s That is how slow moving or held back, depending on how you prefer to view it, these Islands were during that era

Terry's early years were sickly - so sickly in fact that he recounts one episode where he sees an image of a man's face in the clouds. Feeling so ill, he wishes he could float up to heaven, the man tells young Terry. "Not yet, not yet, you are not ready; you have much to do before you come to heaven. Not a terribly humble beginning to the book.

However, after making a steady recovery. Terry's account of his childhood in Stanley will strike a cord with anyone who grew up in the Islands before 1982

I laughed out loud at the de-



scription of Terry's little turf gang getting rumbled by Police Sergeant Williams for. " collecting eggs from the odd henhouse, pulling up vegetables out of peoples gardens and taking them home to consume. all minor details as far as he was concerned.

A reference to the, "... odd home with a broken window as a result of a misdirected stone which had been intended for a nearby street made my face burn with the knowledge that as a Stanley kid I too had been guilty of this hei-

Terry takes the reader through the Argentine invasion and his own inner battle with his feelings for his family. While Terry made his pro-British position clear, his older brother Alec was considered a traitor, and possibly a spy. by some locals when he left the Islands on the Argentine hospital ship Bahia Paraiso to live in Argentina

He gives a moving account of his final moments in Stanley with his brother, shortly before Alec left the Falklands. Terry asks Alec. Were you an Argentine spy?

His brother tells him not to be so stupid, that before the war. Argentine dignitaries were regularly



invited to cocktail parties and other events at Government House, and the Marine barracks at Moody Brook - "They had all the information they needed long before they invaded.

Alec angrily adds, "I am not a bloody Argentine spy now, and I have never been any t**king Argentine spy. But what people can't get into their heads, including you. perhaps, is that I cannot support the British position over the Falklands. They have done P**k all for the place in 150 years and now look at the bloody mess they have go vou in. I say you, because you're stuck with it. I'm leaving, and furthermore, I'm leaving because I want to live in Argentina with the woman I love, simple as that.

A Falkland Islander till I die contains an interesting and probably the only existing account of the work carried out by the General Employees Union (GEU) and of the gradual dissolution by the Sheep Owners' Association of the Cost of Living Bonus coveted by Camp and Stanley workers alike.

After 1982 the country underwent huge changes in business, government, lifestyle and conspicuously so does the author's attitude

Up to this point. I felt the book had been an unpretentious down to earth insight into the life of a Falkland Islander. However part two, while a compelling read recording Terry's years as a fishing mogul and leading businessman in the Falklands community, at times made me feel as though I was observing a peacock preening its feath-

Reflecting on his life so far. Terry writes. "I am satisfied that I have made a useful and meaningful contribution to Falkland Islands commerce, and to the economy of the Falkland Islands as a whole. I can also tell you that I did so with the clear aim of improving the standard of living and quality of life for my fellow Falkland Islanders and of course myself

My contributions to the private sector, and the Falkland Islands economy, have come via several channels, personally through private company activities, as a President of the Chamber of Commerce, as a politician, as an honorary board member or company director of organisations such as the Falkland Islands Development Corporation or the Tourist Board.

I have played a leading role in the improvement of working and pay conditions for the ordinary working man in the Falklands, as the leader of the trade union Terry has led an interesting life as have many other Falkland Islanders

Oh ves, that mystery voice of many years ago which encouraged me to fight on, as I was about to quit on life, was absolutely right. I had things to do

If nothing else. I hope this book spurs on other, more naturally gifted writers who might realise that they also have a story and will be inspired enough to tell it.

Falkland Islander till I die will be available to buy in Stanley from June 2004.

Development Corporation's 'pro-active and customer focused' work

MARCH and April have been two busy months for the Development Corporation team who their General Manager says are, "...increasingly looking at pro-active, customer focus.

After announcing that the Falklands Development Corporation has managed to reduce its budget by 3%. Julian Morris gave a update to the Corporation's Board on the organisation's activities

He said a group comprising representatives from tourism, customs, aviation, the secretariat. FIDC and the private sector are meeting to carry out a quick review of the Mount Pleasant terminal facilities and evaluate areas for improvement. He said LanChile has been approached to see if they would have any interest in providing technical advice or financing but

the project is currently too small. Following two workshops. £25.000 of funding has been approved from the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) to de-

velop a Rural Enterprise/Tourism centre at Hill Cove. Mr Morris This is intended to improve the tourism offering and also provide a focus for rural/craft enterprise. Work is programmed to be carried out ready for the start of next season. A key feature of this initiative is for the people on the west to 'own' the initiative and drive it through to completion and operation.

A review of the UK Falkland Islands Trust's work for the last ten years promoted discussion over funding in the future. Over £200.000 has been invested in learning about shelter belt provision and seaweed, it was decided that £15,000 would be invested this year with no further contributions in further years.

The 'Start up Offices' at FIDC are proving popular, however Mr Morris was keen to stress that they were short term lets for a maximum of one year, and were designed as. ... a migration from home to the private sector," and in no way meant to compete with the private

Mr Morris informed the board that Financial Advisor, Amara Doyle has announced that she will probably not be renewing her contract, he said she has done. "...a terrific job at FIDC. " adding. .. whoever follows her will have a difficult job to do.

Mr Morris said discussions with shipping company Maersk indicate whilst they are still looking at a June technical visit, no progress has been made. However he added that the Ministry of Defence is increasingly happy about making the St Brandon available for trips to Punta Arenas

The Sand Bay abattoir now has insurance cover to the value of £2.5 million at a cost of £16,000 per annum, this equates to £1 per sheep going through the abattoir.

Director of Agriculture, Neil Judd gave a verbal report to the board, on the success of the ram sale, work shops led by a leading Artificial Insemination technician and a field day at Port Howard

Mr Judd said that with regard to the reindeer herd, investigations were still being made into the farms in the running to host the reindeer herd. It is hoped a decision will be made and the herd moved at the end of May

One expression of interest in the resiting of the National Beef Herd has been received although Mr Judd was confident there would be more, saying. "... selection for the moving of the beef herd would begin at the end of April.

During a discussion on the Way Forward Project, a ten year farming plan, the suggestion was made that farmers not attending workshops would not receive further funding in phase two of the Pasture improvement scheme; in addition farmers who have participated successfully in the way forward project may work as ambassadors during Farmers Week

Mrs Thatcher was 'a breed apart'

I HAVE some interest in the Falklands having designed more than four years ago a colourful poster on the history of the Royal British Legion which was endorsed by her late majesty the Queen Mother.

There was also in it mention of Colonel H Jones who fell in the 1982 conflict with Argentina and I received a gracious letter from H's widow Sarah, as I am a member of the Yardley Wood branch here in Birmingham

Copies of the tribute which went to 600 Legions across the UK were delivered by Bob Fiddes, an old Royal Naval man who ran a flourishing sea cadet venture, to the Falkland Islands Council and the Commander of British Forces.

The then Governor's Secretary phoned me after being contacted by the Foreign Office and facilitated the passage through security which normally would have taken several weeks to reach its destina-

I myself have written a few pieces for some small radio stations run by ex-pats around the globe, free-gratis. My late father, a regional journalist and author contributed to BBC Northern Ireland from the 1920s up to the late 1980's, so I grew up with media in my veins although I took a formal course in theology in Canada

There is certainly food for thought here in Britain as the people living under the threat of terrorism debate the wisdom of our intervention in Iraq. What Baroness Thatcher makes of this debate

is anyone's guess

She was unquestionably a decisive politician and she carried the day by force of personality. I don't think that any other politician of her generation would have contemplated going to war to save the Falk-

She was a breed apart and fuelled by principle much maligned and misunderstood at home but revered in your Islands for the integrity associated with Britishness.

WHY are people from the computer department not sent away for training? Although they have someone down to train them now and again, it seems this is not satisfactory as too much is crammed in, in too short a time.

A Chief Executive Chris Simpkins replied, "The whole premise of the question is incorrect. Staff from the computer department have been sent for specialist training in the UK when necessary and where that training cannot be provided locally. Subject to funding, there are plans for more overseas training during the next financial year.

Q It is afleged that Senior Government Officers are collecting LanChile "air miles" from their official government funded travel. Is this ethical? And when redeemed is this a taxable benefit in kind?

A The Government Secretary, Peter King, provided the following response.

Government has asked LanChile whether an FIG account for air miles could be set up so that Government itself would benefit from the air miles awarded on all flights paid for by Government.

LanChile has confirmed that such corporate accounts

may be established in Chile, but not for organisations outside Chile, therefore anyone travelling on LanChile on flights paid by Government accrues the air miles personally.

At the present time it is cheaper to travel LanChile to and from the UK than it is via Tristar. At present it would take three return trips to the UK to accrue sufficient air miles for a return trip from Stanley to Punta Arenas using air miles.

The use of air miles must be planned as only a small amount of seats are allocated for passages paid for in air miles on each flight.

With regard to the taxation position on the use of air miles the cost of the "free" flight using air miles is chargeable to tax as a non cash emolument (a gain) from that employment on the person acquiring the air miles, not a benefit in

Teachers have a pretty good deal

I THINK I heard violins play and almost had to reach for a Kleenex when I read your editorial on the plight of an 'insider' contract teacher and his/her desire to return home for Christmas

Firstly, the existing Christmas break is only a few years old. Before that, the summer break was a) longer, and b) the same as other southern hemisphere countries; that is, we broke up closer to Christmas and enjoyed a holiday in the prime weeks of a southern hemisphere year.

The dates of the summer break, at that time, also enabled contract teachers time to return home, albeit not via Machu Picchu or Iguazú. Those arrangements suited everyone, but particularly pupils, and even more particlularly, pupils from Camp, who were back on their farms at the busiest and best time of the year.

Secondly, on the subject of salary: with gratuities, and free flights home, the salary of a contract teacher at least equates to that of a UK teacher, and is considerably more than our colleagues from the antipodes earn in their countries of

Thirdly, you wrote about teachers applying for posts here for the 'Falklands Experience'. They also apply for posts here because it is a great jumping-off place for South America, or even the Antarctic. And why not?

In the education world, there is actually a term for teachers who use their teaching qualifications and skills to see the world, and I did not invent it. They are called 'Mavericks' - (a person of independent or unothodox views - Collins English Dictionary).

Fourthly, there is another major plus for a teacher arriving in this community. While we have our own unique problems here, our schools are good places in which to deliver our skills.

We do not work in overcrowded classrooms; we do not have to teach rude, sometimes even violent, disaffected pupils, as is the case in many urban schools today; the staff/pupil ratio is excellent; pupil funding, per capita, particularly for Camp pupils, far exceeds that of a British pupil; (staggeringly, almost ten times that of a British junior school pupil, and five times that of a British secondary pupil - from the Inspection Report 2000); and, on the whole, we have supportive parental support.

Quite apart from the fact that this small community cannot supply all the teachers we need. I happen to believe that the input of contract teachers is a wholesome addition to our education system. They bring fresh ideas and new skills to our pupils. Some stay and some go, but they all bring extra, valuable experience and knowledge to our pupils.

While this may be a hindsight solution for any teacher unhappy with the present debate about changing the summer holiday dates. but one which may be a useful one for future applicants wishing to teach in the Falklands: Consult a world map and be aware that this is a southern hemisphere community.

Route 38, on the other hand. will function from 7pm to 11 30pm with wholesome pub grub, such as curry, shepherd's pie, pizza and chicken meals on the menu being served from the bar.

The new names came as a result of a competition which invited personnel to submit appropriate suggestions. These were then whittled down to three finalists and a radio phone-in allowed the customers to choose the winners. So far. the enhanced facilities and relaxed social atmosphere have proven a hig hit

Laura Stewart who has just arrived to take over responsibility for the area said. "...having just arrived in the Falklands, it has been great to walk into such a fantastic, new, challenging complex. With all of the great comments. I have had passed on to me. I am sure this is a well deserved and well received investment for all people hving here at MPA.

The military spokesperson said. "Facilities such as these significantly enhance the quality of life by providing a relaxing social atmosphere for all to enjoy

Military social area gets upgrade Hostel's Lorraine:

STANLEY HOUSE, a bostel for children from Camp who attend school in Stanley, has been a surrogate home to hundreds of children since it opened in 1982.

Lorraine McGill has spent the past twenty-one years of her life at the hostel, first as houseparent and later as Head of Hostel. Now just weeks in to her retirement, she looks back on her years of caring for children from Camp.

LORRAINE, her son Roy and daughter Jane, moved to Stanley from their home on Carcass Island in February 1982. It was a difficult decision to make but the children needed to attend full-time

At the time, the hostel was full with a long waiting list so the family bought a house in town to provide a base from which the children could attend school. Lorraine s husband Rob remained to operate the business at Carcass but the family spent the school holidays together at home and Rob visited Stanley whenever he could

Soon after the move. Lorraine was approached by the then Superintendent of Education John Fowler who asked if she would do some voluntary work for the hos-

At that time the boys lived in Stanley House and although the girls had lunch and supper there. they had breakfast and slept in a house on Racecourse Road, looked after by Mrs Mary Faria. Lorraine worked with the girls in the evenmgs, allowing some free time for Mary and an expectant houseparent

Lorraine had only been in Stanley for six weeks when the Argentine forces invaded. On the afternoon of the invasion, the Education Department was faced with the task of getting the borders back to their anxious families in Camp

Brooke Hardcastle at Darwin had told Lorraine by phone that if the children could be transported to Goose Green, he would arrange for the (delivery boat) Penelope to move from Speedwell Island to Egg Harbour to transport the West children to Port Howard John Fowler asked if Lorraine would accompany and help look after the children if he was able to arrange transport out of town

She takes up the story: "The next morning we scrabbled things together and off we went to Stanley House, we left there in 18 Land Rovers, nose to tail from the back of the hostel. The Argentinians had offered to transport us but John Fowler wisely said we had enough transport offered by kind volunteer local drivers

Fifty-two people left town together with all the children's belongings. We first went to Bluff

Cove then on to Entroy, where John and Lizzie Lee generously gave the children lunch. Along the way we were met by drivers from the farms and this allowed the town drivers to return. We then travelled on to Goose Green and Darwin where we spent the night

We had an early breakfast then departed for the Penelope trip from Egg Harbour As we left Goose Green the Argentinians were arriving there. About half-way across the Sound we were buzzed by Argentine arrerali-

We remembered that any moving local transport had been asked to fly a white flag. Susan Nightingale had packed some of her things in a white pillowcase so the skipper. Findlay Ferguson flew that We got to the West and everyone eventually got home safely

Lorraine returned to Stanley soon after the surrender accompanying Kurt Whitney, a young man who had stayed with the McGills on Carcass Island for the duration of the war.

She remained in Stanley with her children and became a houseparent at Stanley House in March 1983. She says, "School was about to start and John Lowler again asked if I would come and work - and this time I would be paid!

The hostel children didn t come back to school until the new year. This was due to the fact that the Argentinians had occupied Stanley House as their command post during the war and after the surrender British Forces used it for a time. On their return, the boys slept in cabins in Stanley House grounds, whilst the girls were crammed into three rooms upstairs in the main house

Lorraine describes the role of a houseparent. "You're a mum really It's about just being there for the children and doing everything one can to make sure everyone is in the right place at the right time with the right equipment for what they are intending to do. It is also about finding interesting things for the children to do and organising their time and outings for them just as parents do

She became Deputy Head of Hostel in 1988. At that time David Burgess was the headmaster of the Senior School and he had overall responsibility for the hostel but the day to day management of it was down to Lorraine After the Community School opened in 1992, she became Head of Hostel

Lorraine says the role of Head of Hostel differs greatly from that of houseparent. She explains. You're not as close to the children as a houseparent, because you're not putting them to bed and waking them up

"But you are still always there

to help them and you're the one everybody looks to for answers.

"It is like a balancing act with a lot of people to please - the children the staff, the parents and the administration. But it was terrific, it was challenging and fin and every day was different."

She said she was grateful to her colleagues and everyone who gave support to her and the hostel over the years. — including personnel from the Eire PWD FIG VS and Power and Fleetified Departments, together with so many other kind people in the community.

Lorraine says there are both positive and negative aspects to looking after other people's children, but most valuable was the trust placed in her by parents and children. They get to know you and how you tick. I feel very privileged to have had that trust and I understand how difficult it is for Camp parents having to send their children away, from home for school.

"When your children leave home at an early age, it leaves a huge gap in the family and adjusting to this can be as difficult for the parents as it is for the children."

One of the difficulties of the job she says is. — trying to get the balance right. We've got to where we are through trial and error really. Some things work and others don't and have to be rethought.

"For instance, some parents would like their children to have more free time, whilst others think they have too much, so finding a middle line through these issues, whilst aiming to please everyone, can be a bit tricky."

Lorraine believes Stanley House is much different to when she ioined. "There were 28 children then, but with the addition of new accommodation, we moved up through the 30s and 40s. The most boarders were 53, but that was only for a short time. With the

depopulation of Camp, we are currently looking after 29 children but numbers are dropping. Since military families have been stationed at MPA we have looked after their older children as weekly boarders.

In my early years at the hostel it was a rather stark place with no real comforts. Everything looked beaten up and dingy Gradually over the years as the budget allowed it changed into a bright, homely welcoming place It is well kitted out with computers. TVs. games and a hobby's

cabin. The children too have more luxurious possessions. Games consoles, personal televisions, you name it they've got it. I guess it reflects today's expectations and the wealth we didn't have before.

Lorraine says the children have changed from the early days too.

"After the war, quite a few were traumatised

"Children from Goose Green had been locked up in the hall and seen their parents taken out at gun point. Others from the San Carlos areas had been in Bomb Alley. They had made friends with British servicemen and then seen some of them killed in the bombing.

"As a result they would become quite aggressive at times—and played mostly war games when they came back here."

It was a difficult time for them, but they gradually began to talk about it and said how frightened they had been. As those children grew up and left, the newcomers were calmer. They did not remember the war, only what they had heard from their parents, so progressively, life became normal again.

Two new accommodation blocks were officially opened by HRH Prince Andrew in May 1985. Lorraine said this made a huge difference to life at the hostel. "...although the boys weren't that bothered about their new building because they loved living in the cabins."

"It was brilliant for the girls, because they had been packed in like sardines and we had a lot of problems due to overcrowding."

Lorraine will clearly miss Stanley House: "It was a lively place to work with lots going on all the time. There is a lot of laughter and fun and a big family atmosphere."

She is now looking forward to a more normal lifestyle. For many years she was on call 24 hours a day and calls came at all hours so her life was restricted by her job.

Now she says her life in the future will be "very different."





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

Mammography and breast screening

BREAS1 screening is a method of detecting breast cancer at a very

The first step involves an X-ray of each breast called a mammogram

The mammogram can detect small changes in breast tissue which may indicate cancers which are too small to be felt either by the woman herself or the doctor

Breast screening is advised for women over 50 years old every three years

At present this screening in the

UK is offered to women from 50 to 70 years old. After 70 years you are still eligible to continue having

that breast screening has lowered death rates from cancer and it is estimated will save 1250 lives by the year 2010. a 25% reduction in mortality

The UK has screened more than 14 million women and has detected over 80,000 cancers

- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 3/4 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup sugar
- /2 cup butter, softened 2 large eggs

Method

Preheat oven to 350 degrees Grease and flour a 13x9 baking

cooker

In a small bowl, combine bananas. lemon nuce, and vanilla. In another small bowl, combine flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, and einnamon

In a large bowl, add brown sugar. sugar and butter; beat on medium speed until light and creamy. Add 1 egg at a time; beat well after each one. On low speed, alternately add the flour mixture and the banana mixture, start with flour and end with flour. Beat batter just until smooth.

Spoon batter into prepared pan and bake for 25 to 30 minutes or until toothpick comes out clean.

Cool cake on wire rack

Brown Butter Frosting 6 tablespoons butter.3 cups confectioners' sugar. 5 tablespoons

milk. 2 teaspoons vanilla. In a small saucepan, heat butter over medium heat until melted and dark nutty brown colour, but not burned, about 6 to 8 minutes, stir. occasionally Immediately transfer butter into pie plate, refrigerate until firm, about 30 minutes

In a large bowl, mix chilled butter, sugar, milk and vanilla on medium speed until creamy and smooth. Spread frosting over cooled cake





Tax penalty notice spurs returns

THE Tax Office says it sent penalty notices to non-trading companies not in an attempt to make money, but to prompt the businesses to send in their tax returns

Penguin News was contacted by a Stanley businessman who said the Tax Office had issued a number of £50 00 fines, with no prior warning, to companies which are nontrading and, in some cases, have been dissolved who did not submit their Payment On Account of Tax and Retirement Pension Contribution returns for March.

However the Senior Acting Taxation Officer says the penalty notice was purely to encourage companies to submit their returns.

Karen Drysdale explained. "When the Taxation Office sent out Employers Guides earlier this year we requested that any companies that no longer have employees complete 'NIL' returns and send a letter of explanation to the Taxation Office showing when they last employed anybody.

"Not all companies responded with 'NIL' returns or a letter. Therefore, the only other option available was to issue all listed employers/companies with a penalty letter to encourage a response allowing us to update our records correctly."

Ms Drysdale said that all employers/companies who have contacted the Taxation Office since receiving the penalty notice, stating they no longer have employees, "...are no longer liable to the £50 penalty."

Importers meeting follows shipping rates increase

FALKLANDS importers have met to discuss shipping links and sea freight costs to and from the Islands.

A spokesperson for the Chamber of Commerce said the meeting had been prompted by a recent announcement from the Ministry of Defence that freight rates would be increased in future.

Some importers say they are fac-

ing increases of up to 45%.

The spokesperson said, "The effect of such increases on the Falklands economy was discussed as was the desirability of improving ship-

ping links where economically possible. The meeting welcomed the news that the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) attached high priority on this issue and were already working to evaluate what progress might be made.

"The Corporation is collating a map of all freight movements to and from the Falklands to see if alternative options could be put in place that would improve services, at lower costs. Businesses with interests in wool, fishing and importing who wish to contribute to this are invited to

contact Tim Cotter at FIDC.

He added, "An announcement from Island Shipping Limited (see page 3) that freight opportunities to and from Punta Arenas were to be enhanced by the introduction of a service using a vessel capable of carrying containers was also welcomed."

The meeting agreed that Falklands exporters face growing challenges in terms of cost and availability of appropriate freight services, "...and these need to be resolved if the Falklands economy is to grow as all would like."

Reports from the public meeting

Inquiry avoided 'knee-jerk' reaction

IS IT normal for criminal matters to be investigated by internal enquir-

That was the question put to councillors at the public meeting, following the conviction of nurse Denise Schophaus for theft of a drug from the hospital.

An inquiry was held at the hospital into the mishandling of drugs in August 2003 after pethidine went missing - a thest Ms Schophaus denied but was later convicted of

The member of the public asked why police were not immediately called in to investigate the loss of the pethidine

Councillor John Birmingham said the concept of someone stealing drugs from the hospital was "alien"

to the Falklands.

He said, "The first time it happened, I think, people went one way in not being accusing and giving everybody the benefit of the doubt.

"No one wanted a knee jerk reaction.'

The Chief Executive Chris Simpkins later told Penguin News, 'It is a matter of public record that. following receipt of a report of apparent irregularities in the procedures for the handling of controlled drugs at KEMH, and in accordance with the provisions of General Orders, on

August 21, 2003 I commissioned a Panel of three civil servants to conduct a preliminary investigation and report their findings to me Denise Schophaus had been suspended the previous day with the agreement of

His Excellency The Governor.

"The Panel completed their report on September 8. Prior to this, on August 29, the suspension was lifted upon my recommendation to the Acting Governor following a review of the evidence against Ms. Schophaus by myself, the Attorney General and the Director of Human

The Attorney General's (AG) specific advice was sought in relation to whether a criminal investigation should be conducted. The AG's advice was that a police investigation was inappropriate since, at that time, there was no firm evidence of criminal misapplication of controlled drugs.

"As previously reported, procedures for the accounting of controlled drugs at the hospital were tightened as a result of the investigation and recommendations of the Panel It was those improved procedures that helped to secure the conviction of Ms Schophaus following discovery of further irregularities in January 2004.

'The Falklands can cope without illex'

FALKLANDS society in its present form could continue without the illex fishery, Councillor Mike Summers believes.

During discussion about the effect of the poor illex season on the Falklands, he told a public meeting on Tuesday evening, "I am convinced it is possible for us to carry on the sort of society that we have and the kind of community that we have at the moment, with the loss of all illex income if we absolutely have to."

However he added that there was "no suggestion" that there is no illex left.

Councillor Summers said the reduction in income for this financial year is in the order of £10 million However he said the "real task" will be dealing with next year. He explained, "We may not take all the losses this financial year. We will take some of them next year by way of discounts to people who are coming back. The real task for next year is to try and encourage back all those people who buy licenses here."

He said that with the uncertainty, the Falklands need to make themselves more attractive. "It is likely the reduction of illex fees next year will be in the order of three, four or five million.

"Our task now is to try and set a budget for next year and years looking forward."

He added that the Falklands are, looking to at least break even in that sort of scenario."

International expectations for albatross care

WE MUST take responsibility to care for our wildlife, say councillors.

A member of the public, an island resident, said he is disturbed by the amount of money Falklands Conservation is spending. He said albatross losses are not as the charity claims.

Another member of the public strongly disagreed and said it is a fact that trawl nets kill the birds by the hundred and that the number of albatross in the Falklands has dramatically reduced in the last five years.

Councillor Summers told the meeting that the rest of the world expects the Falklands to care for its wildlife.

He said, "It is a fact that the international community at large is very concerned about the albatross and we have to be careful about what we do and what we are seen to be

"We need to be respected by the international community to fight our

international cause.

"Whether you believe in it or not, it is probably a good thing to be on the side of the people who want to protect them."

No application for memorial inauguration

NO application has yet been received for a consecration ceremony for the Argentine memorial at Darwin.

The memorial was completed by contractors AWG (Falklands) Ltd approximately two weeks ago.

The building of the memorial was secured by the 1999 Agreement between Argentina and Britain.

A member of the public asked councillors if claims reported in the Argentine press, that the Agreement is only valid for five years, is true and that the deal would have to be renegotiated this year.

Councillor Summers said the claim is entirely untrue.

National Vocational Qualifications (NVQ's)

What are they?

National Vocational Qualifications (NVQ's) are internationally recognised qualifications which demonstrate you can actually do a job well and prove that a person has gained the knowledge and experience to the required standard within their profession or occupation. The standards and requirements of NVQ's for each profession are set by practicing professionals on the ground which ensures their relevance to the actual job.

NVQ's are made up of units of credit that describe the skills and knowledge required to do a job effectively. These 'units' are divided into 'elements' that identify the tasks required. Elements are further broken down to identify exact actions which are required to be proven to, or observed by, an 'Assessor'.


Assessors are qualified and/or experienced professionals who have also undertaken a training regime which leads to qualified assessor status. The Assessor award is accredited at NVQ Level 3.

Assessors are advised and supported by' Internal Verifiers' who's role it is to ensure all assessors are fair in their judgements and clear on the requirements. Qualified Internal Verifiers must have had at least 2 years experience of assessing, they must undergo a training regime which leads to qualified Internal Verifier status. The Internal Verification award is accredited at NVQ Level 4.

NVQ's can be taken in many professions and subjects. A quick search of QCA's database identifies 1207 NVQ's on offer at this point in time. Within each of these a wide range of optional choices enable candidates to choose specific units that are relevant to their individual role. The number of NVQ's on offer is continually growing due to the value now being placed on vocational training in the workplace.

NVQ's were introduced to UK in the 1980's and the rapid growth in the numbers of centres since then is a clear indicator of the value of these awards. Schools and Colleges also offer GNVQ's which are vocational orientated but more theory based. Colleges are offering rapidly expanding NVQ programmes in a wide range of professions.

Currently the Falkland Islands Training centre is accredited to offer varying levels of NVQ's in 6 different professions.

A prickly problem |

IT IS that time of year again, when thistles are nodding their purple heads and shaking out cottony thistle down all over Stanley.

A number of people have noticed that they appear to be spreading and conservationists fear that if they are left for a few more years the spread of this non-native weed will be uncontrollable.

Last year. Falklands Conservation and the Agriculture Department called on the public to report any sightings of these spectacular purple flowering plants. Falklands Conservation trustee Philippa Thompson is helping to eradicate the plants. She said. "On East Falkland the problem appears to be concentrated in Stanley and also at Mare Harbour.

"The only reports received from West Falkland were from Saunders Island and of a single plant on Pebble Island. Reports of thistles on Keppel Island have not been confirmed."

Thistles are regarded as an agricultural nuisance. Control of introduced thistles is a necessary job on many farms in Australia and New Zealand. In the UK, legislation was passed in the 1959 Weed Act to facilitate compulsory control of these plants.

Ms Thompson said, "They compete for light and nutrients with crops and can quickly take over fertile pasture land

"The thorns present an additional nuisance for sheep farmers as they get caught up in fleeces, presenting a problem for the shearers. They can also cause mouth abrasions in grazing sheep thus providing entry for the bacteria that cause a sheep condition known as 'orf'."

There are two species of thistles in the Falklands; both have purple flowers, spiny leaves and white cottony seed heads. The Spear thistle (Cirsium vulgare) is a biennial and can be removed by cutting it at the



root. The Creeping thistle (Cirsium arvense) is a perennial and spreads from the roots and is more difficult to remove.

Ms Thompson explained, "Chemical control is the only effective option. The Spear thistle has larger purple flowerheads than the other species and has a very spiny stem. Once the thistles have flowered there is no point in removal by digging unless the heads can be totally destroyed by burning."

Discussions have been taking place in Stanley to see if the problem of thistles can be addressed. Ms Thompson said, "One thing that is clear is that it would take the cooperation of a number of organisations and of many individual volunteers over a period of two or three years to get these plants under control.

"In addition, vigilance would be required in the future to ensure that they did not regain a hold In particular, care would have to be taken at sites where imported materials are delivered and stored, and also for vicilors arraying by air and by sea."

visitors arriving by air and by sea."

She added, "In most places around the world, the negative effects of invasive species have been recognised only when they have already become a problem. It would be a huge achievement if the Falkland Islands could co-ordinate a programme to remove them before it is too late."

Q WHAT was the cost to the government for the importation of the cattle from Chile? Are the vets fees (airfares, daily wage etc) being paid for by the private sector? If not, why not?

A Senior veterinary Officer, Steve Pointing offered the following answer

swer.

The lead-up to importing cattle from Chile began a long time ago (over 12 months) and all the decisions on costings and charges were made at that time when Dr Peter Johnston was Director of Agriculture.

A decision was made at that stage not to charge for veterinary or laboratory staff time involved in the import process as to do so would almost certainly have rendered the project unviable with the result that the cattle would not have been imported. It was felt by senior Agriculture Department (DoA) staff that this was an important introduction of new genetic material into the Islands that would, in future, benefit not just the private individual taking the risk of importing the cattle but those involved in the beef industry more widely.

Although staff time has not been charged for, all other costs incurred by Government will be charged to the importer. These include items such as airfares to and from Punta Arenas, accommodation charges connected with visits to Punta Arenas, all laboratory testing procedures both in Chile and in the UK and airfares and accommodation costs on Bleaker Island to check the cattle whilst in quarantine and to carry out further tests as required.

further tests as required.

The DoA beef advisor travelled with the *Tamar* to and from Punta Arenas using a part of his own leave so technically he was on holiday. A

private Chilean vet accompanied the cattle back from Punta Arenas and he charged for his services directly to the importer. The Government will issue an invoice to the incompaniem of the

end of the quarantine period in mid -May when all the costs have been finalised.

Q CONGRATULATIONS to Manfred Keenleyside on becoming the new Director of Public Works. But why, if he is a local man who can do the job, was it necessary to advertise overseas for the post? Who made that decision and how much did the advertising cost? Was this not a waste of money?

A Kathleen Dobbyns, Director of Human Resources provided the following response.

The process to recruit a Director of Public Works began following approval by Executive Council before the failure of the current fishing season.

Had it not been for this change in circumstances, the criteria against which candidates would have been judged would have been different and the outcome may also have been different. The change could not have been predicted at the time.

The process attracted good overseas interest and it is to his credit that Manfred Keenleyside won through.

The cost of advertising overseas was £9,174.05 which pales into insignificance when compared to the estimated £400,000 that will be saved over the period of the con-

Desire chairman's upbeat report

DESIRE PETROLEUM has published its preliminary results for last year and outlined its seismic research which took place this year.

In his annual report, Chairman of Desire, Dr Colin Phipps updated shareholders on the progress of a 3D seismic survey carried out by Fugro Geoteam A/S, over some of the larger prospects for oil in Desire's tranches C and D in the North Falkland Basin.

Dr Phipps said Fugro Geoteam A/S were contracted, "...on a fixed-price turnkey basis," to acquire the 3D seismic and the survey was successfully completed on April 1, 2004, with a final total of 804 sq. km.

He said the quality of data collected is good and, "...processing has already begun at the facilities of Robertson Research International Ltd."

He added, "The volume of data is very considerable and processing is likely to take until September of this year, at which time a detailed geological interpretation of the survey will be made.

"The interpretation is expected to take about two/three months to complete. The well locations for the next round of drilling will be selected on the basis of this interpretation."

Dr Phipps said future drilling remains dependent upon a successful farm-out and he was pleased to report a "significant increase" in interest in the North Falkland Basin by the Oil Industry.

He said, "The continuing strength of the oil price, together with the much-publicised failure of oil companies to replace their reserves, especially from traditional areas such as the North Sea, have led to renewed interest in frontier exploration in areas such as the Falkland Islands.

"A number of companies have signed confidentiality agreements with Desire, in order to interpret both the existing 2D and the new 3D seismic data.

"Discussions with these companies will take place in parallel with the 3D processing and interpretation with a view to agreeing a farm-out drilling programme with a partner, or partners, to be initiated in 2005 dependent upon rig availability."

The Desire Chairman paid tribute to dedication of his colleagues on the company's board. He commended, "...their enthusiastic commitment to its future as demonstrated by their willingness, via the Placing and Open Offer, to participate in that future by reinvesting their fees in the Company's shares.

"The Company's success in maintaining a low level of overheads is due, in no small measure, to the time and effort spent on the Company's affairs by my colleagues on the Board: time and effort not adequately recognised by their compensation.

"As in past years, therefore, it is intended to remedy this defect by means of the award of share options."

My office was asked by the police after four o'clock in the afternoon as to whether a prosecution should be brought

The police and I were agreed that it should not be because it would not have been possible in the time available to bring the offender before a court if a Summons had to be issued and served in the usual way

The Chief Police Officer and I have agreed that the police in similar circumstances in the future will use a provision of law which would enable the offender to be arrested (arrest is not usually available for speeding offences) taken to the police station and brought straight before a court.








02. How confident do you feel about the Falklands' financial future in general?

Your heart and how it works

ARE YOU living with a heart condition or do you care for someone who does?

This introduction to heart terms explains how the heart works, and gives explanations of the medical terms you might hear while talking to doctors and nurses.

Your heart and how it works.

1) The right side of the heart receives blood from the body and pumps it through the pulmonary arteries to the lungs. There it picks up fresh oxygen and gives off carbon dioxide.

2) The left side of the heart receives oxygen-rich blood from the lungs, and pumps it through the aorta to the body.

The heart and circulatory system.

Every organ in your body needs to be supplied continuously with blood to function properly. Fresh blood brings oxygen and food to the tissues and carries away unwanted carbon dioxide and other waste products.

The blood circulates around your body through a closed system of blood vessels. The heart is the pump, which pumps it around.

It has four chambers and a oneway valve system. Each contraction, or heart beat, pumps blood forward into the arteries. The arteries divide off into smaller and smaller branches to supply a microscopic network of capillaries, distributing the blood to every part of your body.

Blood is collected from the capillaries by the veins. The branches of the veins join to form larger veins delivering blood back to your heart. Blood from your veins fills the heart as it relaxes during the interval between each contraction. This total circulatory system is called the cardiovascular system. It contains about eight pints of blood, which your heart is continuously re-circulating.

Each day, your heart beats about 100,000 times and pumps

about 5,000 gallons of blood.

The heart is in fact two separate pumps, which work together. The right side of the heart receives dark, de-oxygenated blood, which has circulated around your body. It pumps this to your lungs, where it picks up a fresh supply of oxygen and becomes bright red again.

The left heart receives fresh blood from the lungs and pumps it


rest of the body. Each side of the heart has a thin-walled 'collecting reservoir' (the atrium) which helps to fill the thick-walled major pump (the ventricle). The heart wall is made of a special sort of muscle called the myocardium.



Like every other living tissue, the myocardium itself needs to be continuously supplied with fresh blood. This supply of blood comes from the coronary arteries.



Wool report - week ending April 23

by Neil Judd, Wool Advisor, Department of Agriculture

GENERAL OVERVIEW

Greasy wool prices increased at sales in Australia and New Zealand during the week for all micron categories relevant to Falkland Island farmers

Demand was widespread with strong interest from most of the world's key topmakers in addition

to Chinese buyers.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide", greasy wool prices generally increased by between 2 and 10 pence per kilogram clean during the weeks trading. The exception was 28-micron wool, which increased by 14 p/kg/clean.

British Quotations for Tops British top quotations generally followed Australian and New Zealand greasy wool markets and in-

creased in value. As shown below: World Markets

In Australia, of the 82,671 bales offered to the trade, 70,962 bales were actually sold, with a pass-in rate of 13,9%.

Included in the offering were 6,546 bales of crossbred wool, of which 5,727 bales were sold (passin rate 11.2%).

A similar situation was observed in New Zealand where 90% of the 15,221 bales offered for sale were purchased and in South Africa where 87% of bales offered

(13.260) were purchased by the treade.

Argentine-Chilean relations 'delicate'

ARGENTINE president Nestor Kirchner has rejected the idea that his administration is not honouring natural gas agreements with Chile. and suggested Chilean president Ricardo Lagos's supply reduction claims be addressed to the oil corporations.

It's not us who are selling natural gas to the sister republic of Chile. but the oil corporations," stressed Mr Kirchner who underlined that, "Argentina is not violating any treaty with Chile.

As bilateral tension with neighbouring Chile increases because of the severe restrictions in Argentine natural gas exports, which this week were increased. Mr Kirchner insisted. "What the Chilean government must do is demand oil corporations honour what they promised.

In Chile, Foreign Secretary Soledad Alvear described the situation as "delicate"

Mr Kirchner's statement confirms the Argentine administration's change of attitude which originally accepted it was a bilateral government issue but now has opted to limit the dispute saying it's a business relation between the Chilean government and Argentine based corpora-

Early in the day Cabinet Chief

Alberto Fernández argued that the Chilean government "is confused." as the 1995 natural gas protocol be-tween Argentina and Chile, "_is contrary to Argentine law and that is why it was never ratified by Con-

Before selling gas to Chile, Argentine law states that firstly domestic demand must be supplied and this is not happening currently," said Mr Fernández.

The top Kirchner administration official emphasised that the first priority for the Argentine govern-ment is to satisfy domestic demand. and if there's any surplus it can be exported.

I believe there's much confusion in the Chilean government," said Mr Fernández in response to harsh criticism from President Ricardo Lagos and Chilean opposition leaders complaining about Argentina's decision to drastically cut gas ex-

What Chile must understand is that it's not a lack of planning, at least from this administration. rather years of lack of investment in gas exploration, extraction and distribution," and even when there's responsibility, "...this can't be blamed on an administration that has been in office for eleven months.

However in Santiago Foreign Secretary Alvear insisted the situation has become, "...delicate, it confirms we have differences with Argentina regarding the enforcement of international rules.

When a country subscribes a protocol, that protocol prevails over domestic law. We were not surprised by Mr Fernández's words, he's simply publicly expressing what many Argentines had already pointed added Ms Alvear.

Visiting Magistrate for the Falklands?

THE post of Senior Magistrate may be reduced to a part time position to save money

Members of Standing Finance Committee discussed the possibility of changing the post to that of a visiting magistrate, a system used on Ascension Island and St Helena, and increasing the duties of the Justices of the Peace.

The Financial Secretary, Mr. Derek Howatt, said savings of, "...a a quarter of a million pounds, or part of," could be made over a three year period, if the government did not employ a full time Senior Mag-

Other suggestions from councillors included a one year trial period commencing at the conclusion of the present Senior Magistrate's contract, and a gradual phasing in of the system over the next Senior Magistrate's three year contract.

However the Chief Executive. Chris Simpkins suggested that members, "...couldn't make a final judgement without consultation with his Excellency the Governor."

Acting Governor Harriet Hall yesterday confirmed the appointment process for a new Senior Magistrate is "well underway".

She said the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce, is not part of the interviewing process. "The interview panel consists of Ian Hendry (Foreign and Commonwealth Office Legal Advisers). Lee Hughes (Judiciary Appointments Division of the Department for Constitutional Affairs), Chris Davies (Falkland Islands Government Human Resources) and Sukey Cameron (Falkland Islands Government Representative).

Penguin News asked Miss Hall why the Chief Justice of the Falkland Islands was not included in the interviewing process or, in his absence, another member of the Falkland Islands judiciary: In recent years the Chief Justice has sat on the interview panel.

Miss Hall responded. "It is the Governor's policy that officers should not ordinarily be involved in the selection of their successors.

She added, "The Chief Justice was invited to be part of the selection panel for the appointment of the Senior Magistrate but has de-

Experts worried by 'tampered' explosives

POLICE and bomb disposal experts are concerned by the discovery of two dangerous devices in a public

A high explosive mortar and an antipersonnel mine, remnants of the Falklands War, were discovered on top of rocks on Wireless Ridge by members of the Falkland Islands Defence Force exercising in the area late last week.

When Explosive Ordnance Disoosal officers Sgt Chris Fuller and LCpl Joe Joseph, visited the site, they became concerned as it appeared that the two devices had been placed there by someone and the mine had been tampered with.

Chief of Police Dave Morris said the devices were located, "some distance," from the nearest minefield, indicating they had been picked up and moved.

Superintendent Morris said such action presents not only a danger to the individuals involved but also to the public and to bomb disposal officers. He said, "Moving ordnance can make it more unstable."

He reminded the public. "If they

do discover anything suspicious they should leave it in situ, mark the area and inform the Royal Falkland Islands Police or the Explosive Ordnance Disposal. Under no circumstances should they touch it.

IT LOOKS as though the Senior Magistrate might get the chop (the job, not the person!)

At first it might seem it'll be no great loss; after all doesn't he just sit behind a desk dishing out speeding fines and occasionally imparting a dash of

his myriad wisdom on some poor halfwitted desendant?

Dig deeper and this clearly isn't the case. I fear councillors may have supported this cost cutting idea too hastily, with little regard for the practical issues involved.

Sure, the Senior Magistrate sits through dozens of driving related cases every year and, every now and then, a trial regarding something more serious. But what about what goes on behind the scenes - the legal wheel that most of us never hear or see turning?

I'm referring to issues such as family law, civil claims, probates and, sadly,

the need for a Coroner. All this falls to the Senior Magistrate.

And much of the work is urgent. Who, if unfortunge enough to be in the position of seeking an injunction against a violent partner would want to wait at least a week for a qualified professional to fly to the Islands to issue the order?

The very suggestion seems rather ill-considered.

What will happen when the Senior Magistrate is away? Realistically, a non-temporary judge would need to visit the Islands at least every six months and I guess it would be up to the Justices of the Peace to keep the court open for business.

With all due respect, these people are non-salaried laymen. Will they really want the extra work and responsibility which would befall them? Dealing with speeding cases is one thing, but I doubt many would feel comfortable making judgements on cases much more serious. Has anyone even asked them?

Then there is the ever present Falklands Factor. If the judge doesn't reside in the Falklands, how can he/she be expected to make decisions which reflect the best interests of the community?

They will need a feel for local issues and sensitivities and, much as I hate to admit it, an overseas subscription to Penguin News coupled with a bimonthly visit won't instill this.

Take the drugs issue for example. Would a part-time judge, accustomed to UK society, take as tough a stance as his predecessors when dealing with some poor fool caught with a joint in his possession? I doubt it.

Personally. I don't think this is necessarily a bad thing - but that's a whole

different editorial.

The Falklands government prides itself on an almost entirely drug-free status, due predominantly to the tough sentencing when drugs cases get to court. If we get a part-time, non-resident judge, our society could be af-

Yes we need to make savings; but I would urge those who make the final decision to give this serious thought. Look beyond the money and consider the bigger picture.

Medical committee to consider complaints suggestion

THE complaints procedure at the hospital will be discussed at the meeting of the Medical Committee next week

Members will consider a suggestion by committee lay member Jason Lewis that the hospital improve its complaint procedure by introducing a complaints form.

In a paper to the committee, Mr Lewis says that, under the current system, "...anyone making a complaint is normally expected to do so in writing, or can do so verbally, but, "...the latter can be intimidating for some people."

He suggests the introduction of a complaints form: "These forms would have set questions and a tick box at the side; any members of the public who do not wish to submit written or verbal comments could easily fill these in."

Court news

Farmer narrowly avoids custody

A NORTH Camp farmer came close to being imprisoned after he drove after drinking.

Neil Watson (61) of Long Island Farm pleaded guilty on Wednesday to driving after consuming alcohol. When breathalysed by police on April 19 he gave a lower reading of 122 micrograms of alcohol per 100 millilitres of breath analysed. The legal limit is 35 micrograms.

Prosecutor Ros Cheek told the court that when police were in the Capstan Gift Shop carpark they noticed a Suzuki jeep reversing on the south side of the carpark and at the same time a Range Rover, driven by Mr Watson, reversed from the north side. The vehicles almost collided. A member of the public approached the police to say Mr Watson smelled of alcohol. Officers followed Mr Watson and saw him drive in an "erratic and indecisive" manner so stopped him. His breath test showed a lower reading of 122mg.

Defence lawyer Hugh Ferguson urged the Senior Magistrate, Nick Sanders, not to imprison his client. He said that the inevitable driving disqualification which Mr Watson would receive would have an "enormous impact" on him and his family, more than it would on most other people.

He explained that Mr Watson's farm is over one hour's drive north of Stanley and, as his wife does

not have a driving licence, he would have to heavily rely on family and friends.

Mr Ferguson reminded Mr Sanders of a judgement he made in July 2003. Phillip Eldrige, of the Royal Navy, pleaded guilty to driving with an alcohol level of 141mg. He drove erratically and ran away when three servicemen attempted to apprehend him. Mr Sanders fined Mr Eldridge and sentenced him to community service.

In issuing his sentence. Mr Sanders told Mr Watson this was a, "...serious drink drive offence." He said his usual practice, when people come three times over the legal limit is to consider custody.

However, he said, taking into consideration Mr Watson's age, his lack of relevant previous convictions and giving full credit for his early guilty plea he would not send him to prison.

He told Mr Watson. "I am just persuaded - only just - that it is not appropriate to imprison you."

He fined Mr Watson £1,000, the maximum financial penalty for the offence, and disqualified him from driving for two years. He also ordered him to pay prosecution costs.

Mr Sanders told Mr Watson, "Please be in no doubt you've come very close to going to prison," however he added that he felt this would serve, "...no useful purpose."

Upland Goose up for rent



THE Falkland Islands Company says it has received several expressions of interest from organisations wishing to lease or manage its hotel, the Upland Goose.

The company announced this week that the level of losses predicted for the winter period did not make it viable to keep the hotel running.

Director of FIC, Roger Spink, yesterday confirmed that all staff who are entitled will be given redundancy payments. He added that any staff who might have been

recruited overseas to work at the hotel would be, "...entitled to a return passage," however he added that he did not believe any of the current staff were in fact recruited from overseas.

Mr Spink added, "We have already received interest from other companies in recruiting some staff which we shall be passing on to our staff.

our staff.
"There may also be opportunities for persons to work for whoever takes on the lease or management of the hotel in the future."

Speeders dominate court proceedings

SEVEN people pleaded guilty to various speeding charges in court on Wednesday.

Grant Munro, Cherry Robson, John Clifford and St John Payne all pleaded guilty by post while Dion Stevens, Alun Davies and Gareth Joseph chose to appear before the Senior Magistrate.

All received financial penalties, licence endorsements and were ordered to pay prosecution costs of £50.

Mr Joseph, who was travelling at 56 miles per hour on an unsurfaced part of the Mount Pleasant Road was also disqualified from driving for seven days. Mr Stevens, who only appeared in court a matter of weeks ago was disqualified for fourteen days. He was caught travelling at 59 miles per hour on an unsurfaced section of the Mount Pleasant Road.

Also in court was Alvaro Trivino who pleaded guilty to driving without insurance.

Mr Trivino told the court he had been driving the vehicle of a friend in hospital to collect clothes for the friend. He thought he was covered by his friend's insurance and only discovered this was not the case when he was stopped by police.

The Senior Magistrate said he accepted there had been confusion about the matter but it was up to Mr Trivino to ensure he was insured. He fined him £150.

Fishing stand attracts record numbers

Hamish Wylie said, "....the new Exhibition stand projects a professional and contemporary image of the Falklands and has attracted considerable attention at this busy international Show. Undoubtedly the image we are now projecting has resulted in this increased number of visitors to our nation's stand."

Companies from across the globe have visited the Falkland Islands stand to make genuine enquiries about the species available.

Connie Stevens said yet more have called to suggest, "... the pressure needs to be kept fully on Maersk Sealand (who also visited the Falklands' stand) with a view to starting a regular containerised service between the Falklands and South America, to enable the Falkland Fishing companies to maximize the potential of their products by converting the enquiries from this Brussels Show into firm global sales."

The new Exhibition Stand has been purchased and sponsored jointly by FIDC and the principle Falklands Fishing companies.

General Belgrano had orders to attack the Task Force

THE controversy over the sinking of Argentine battleship General Belgrano on May 2, 1982 by the Royal Navy nuclear submarine HMS Conqueror has again emerged on the 22nd anniversary of the event.

The Argentine press has published alleged internal secret documents of the Argentine Navy indicating that effectively the General Belgrano and its two destroyer escorts, Piedrabuena and Bouchard were preparing to engage the British Task Force from the south east

in a double pronged action combined in the northwest with the deadly Argentine fighter bombers to be launched from the carrier 25 de Mayo.

According to the new documents exposed by the Buenos Aires press, the *Belgrano* and its destroyer escorts had been inside the exclusion zone with the purpose of sinking Royal Navy units, although the combined action with 25 de Mayo had to be aborted because of adverse weather conditions. It's goodbye to BFFI, hello to BFSAI

BRITISH Forces Falkland Islands offically ceased to exist on May 1 as command of the Ascension Island Base was transferred from Strike Command in the United Kindom to Air Commodore Richard Lacey, the Commander British Forces (CBF) based in the Falkland Islands.

The new set up means BFFI becomes BFSAI or British Forces South Atlantic Islands. Air Commodore Lacey's new title is CBFSAI.

Military spokesperson, Captain Jill Hamlin, said the new name reflects the new responsibilities and, "...the close existing link between the Ascension Islands and the Falkland Islands has strengthened."

Captain Hamlin added, "Ascension plays an important role in supporting the Falkland Islands as anyone who has flown between here and Brize Norton on the Tristar or Airbus will know.

"Its location provides the ideal staging post for aircraft which can not fly between UK and the Falkland Islands non-stop. The change of command will have little outward impact on those outside of RFSAI."

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Additional funding approved

THE provision of additional funding of £19500 for a new edition of laws and £150,000 for medical treatment overseas have been approved by Standing Finance Committee.

The meeting of SFC held on Friday, April 30 heard the additional funds required for the medical department are to cover costs of patients referred to South America, long term patients referred to the UK for confinement, rent for family residing in UK for health reasons and Falkland Island Government Office account arrears.

At present six patients are receiving treatment in the UK and eleven patients are in the process of referral to UK.

Eight jobs were submitted for evaluation during the quarter ended March 31

Three of the evaluations were existing jobs where the job content had changed significantly to accommodate additional responsibilities, resulting in two of the posts going up by two grades each and the third post went up by one grade.

One post was evaluated because of a change of emphasis in the department, which resulted in a

change of title and the grade being brought down one step. Two new posts were established with no additional cost to the government.

Goose Green service for Nick Taylor



THE SERVICE of remembrance for Lieutenant Nicholas Taylor, who was killed in action over Goose Green in 1982, attracted a large crowd to the East Falkland settlement on Sunday.

Approximately forty vehicles carried more than a hundred people to the service held at the pilot's graveside near the Goose Green racecourse.

The service was jointly conducted by Monsignor McPartland from the Catholic Church, Rever-

end Paul Sweeting from the Cathedral and Ken Newton representing the Tabernacle.

The words inscribed on the pilot's headstone read: "Lieutenant Nicholas Taylor, 800 Naval Air Squadron, HMS Hernies, Fleet Air Arm, Royal Navy, 4th May 1982. Age 32. In proud memory of a dearly loved husband, son and brother, shot down and killed whilst flying for the country he loved."

Gold and porcelain for auction at Christie's

GOLD And porcelain discovered by Oxford Maritime archaeologist Mensun Bound are to be sold at auction.

Earlier this year, Mensun broke a two year silence concerning the discovery his team made of a 16th century Portuguese galleon off the tiny Island of Mozambique.

The galleon went down carrying gold, spices and Ming porcelain which Mensun and his team discoverd during a routine dive.

The team were in grave danger whilst concealing the treasure they

had smuggled ashore in their dive bags and diving suits and eventually it was flown to the capital in a small light aircraft hidden within a cargo of slightly rancid lobsters. Each lobster had a piece of gold within it. By the time the plane got to Maputo the smell was overwhelming and the cargo was waved through the airport without delay.

The government of Mozambique has now released part of the gold and Ming for auction at Christie's of Amsterdam on May 19.

Cancer expert's thanks to Joyce Allan

GRANDMOTHER Joyce Allan who walked the Cape Pembroke Half Marathon for charity has received a letter of thanks from the North of England Children's Cancer Research Fund.

Consultant paediatrician Dr Kevin Windebank thanked Mrs Allan for forwarding the donation of £2000.60 on behalf of her friends, neighbours and colleagues in the Falkland Islands, adding, "...we are very grateful for the commitment and generosity of all those who organised and supported fundraising

activities." Dr Windebank assured that the money will go, "...directly towards supporting the important research work which is going on in Newcastle into the causes, prevention and treatment of cancer in children."

Dr Windebank said good progress is being made, however, "...we need to continue with this work until a cure is found for all children affected by this disease and we rely on generous people like you to enable us to do this."

Racing trophies returned to Falkands


TWO beautiful silver trophies have recently returned to the Falklands thanks to the efforts of the Stanley Sports Association (SSA).

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Bleeding fishing industry to death' Racism in our 'multicultural society'

RE: 'B' Licence Fee Refunds: would firstly like to note that I write to you not as General Manager of Seafish (Falklands) Ltd. but as a member of the Falkland Islands community. My involvement in the Illex fishery does of course provide me with a knowledge and insight into an industry that very few can be expected to have.

Last week Executive Council approved the recommendation to reduce licence fees for jiggers by 70%. In reaching this decision, you will I am sure, have been conscious of your responsibility to us all to secure the best possible financial outcome for the Islands. To give up the potential to recover part of the licence fees due for 2004 in the first round may politically just not be an option. This I appreciate.

The catch of an average jigger this season was around 50 tons, with much of this caught on high seas. At current ex-vessel prices of \$2,500 per ton for Illex tubes, revenue to owners will be around 70,000.

You are proposing to take around £30,000 of this and leave the jigger owners £40,000 with which to pay crew wages, fuel, lay up costs, maintenance, insurance, etc. In 2003, which apart from 2002 was the lowest catch per vessel since 1996, we acknowledge that we took around 20% of the value of a vessels catch (not profit) in licence fees, and left the owner with 80% to meet his costs. This level of take is unsustainable and we are systematically bleeding the industry to death.

Following the 2002 season a significant number of vessel owners were forced into bankruptcy. Two vessel owners that I know of committed suicide. Owners and their employees live side by side in the same fishing towns, and the feeling of responsibility felt towards the plight of their employees and their families is often too much. Many of their employees returned home to their families with little or no pay, yet we had extracted in the region of £ 100,000 per vessel in fees.

Every pound we take this season for the luxuries our community enjoys in the Falklands will be a pound less to feed the families of the men who come to the Islands to fish it. This is the human cost of our desire to sustain an income from a resource that no longer has the size or the value to do so.

One thing that concerns me about the recommendation you ap-

proved is its practical application. The research cruise carried out this season confirmed without any doubt that the stock is a fraction of the size that is required to sustain a commercial fishery. It is not dispersed like 2002, or moved somewhere else, it barely survived the oceanographic conditions last year. With a life cycle of a year, we are wholly dependent on the squid that survive this season to produce enough eggs to survive and produce a stock for next year. Now that you have guaranteed a further 20% discount to vessel owners next year, and all vessel owners manage to survive until next season, are we really going to licence around ninety vessels to fish a resource from a spawning stock that we know is a fraction of the size that our scientists regard as a minimum? Our fisheries ordinance places conservation paramount in the management of the fishery, and your offer would appear to conflict with this.

All vessel owners have already paid 10% of their licence fees, and therefore the full 90% discount this year, and not diluted over two years (with 70% for this year and a further 20% for next year), is not an unreasonable concession particularly given that you will be unable to honour the 20% concession you have offered for next year for the conservation reasons described above. The wages and costs owners have to pay are being incurred this year - not next year. Our economy is robust enough for us to survive without Illex income although we will have to make some sacrifices. The futures of many of the fishermen and their families are far less certain.

I feel that the level of refund should be reconsidered, taking into account not just the financial implications which influenced your decision last week, but the wider issues outlined above. Speaking for myself, I do not relish the thought of being part of an affluent community, whilst knowing the human cost that has been ignored in order to sustain it.

This is an open letter, which I have copied to the Penguin News. The reason for this is that I feel the social conscience of our community deserves to be consulted when considering this issue. The Penguin News is the most effective way stimulating debate and response from the community on the subject.

I HAVE taken great exception to two articles in last weeks Penguin News, firstly the letter from Robin Goodwin and secondly the mention in the centre page spread of removing, "...half of the non-bona fide Falkland Islanders."

Firstly Mr Goodwin's letter. I am tired of this approach to cost cutting measures, the axe instantly swings in the direction of the contract worker, the pom, the import and all the other various derogatory names that have been bandled around in the past. I would like to draw Mr Goodwin's attention to a particular section of the Falkland Islands Community, that of youth and sporting groups.

In one respect Mr Goodwin is right, there are a lot of people who enter the islands looking for the fast buck, some get it and run but others find that they were mistaken and hang around a bit or choose to put something back. If I am perfectly honest I came here looking for big money and got paid it, that is not however why I remain! That was all of nearly six years ago and I feel I have put my fair share back into the community.

Anyway, back to the thrust of my letter - youth and sporting groups. I have a fair bit of contact with these groups both in my professional capacity and also my own time. Have a good long look at the list of names involved in youth and sporting groups within the islands. There are lots of very valuable Falkland Islander's (born and bred) who are integral to the running of the groups but there are also lots of imports' who give up their own time professionally and personally to make sure the groups carry on.

Lots of groups would not even exist if it were not for the long term 'imports' keeping them going. I am not trying to blow my own trumpet; the small contribution I have made pales into insignificance when you compare it to the efforts

made by Phil Middleton, Marilyn Grimmer, Keith Reddick, Paul Freer and others involved in uniformed youth groups, never mind Steve Burston at the Shack, and that is to name but a few. All these people, imports who do nothing, according to some, other than milk off the poor old Falkland Islander.

There are lots of people in this community who are not regarded as 'bona-fide Falkland Islanders' who make a very valuable contribution and have well and truly paid back what they have taken out, often with some left over.

On the same issue - that single comment 'bona-fide Falkland Islander'. Just what is a 'bona-fide Falkland Islander'? My daughter was born in Leeds but came here as a babe in arms, does she qualify? What of the people who were on these islands 200 years ago, oops there were none!

This is a multicultural community made up of generations of imports, it is such racist terms as this that have driven many a developed society apart and we are on the brink of doing the same.

So yes get rid of your non 'bonafide Falkland Islander's' and see what you have left; how would you decide who should stay? What merit or generational time frame would you put in place? Get a grip Mr Goodwin, the community has changed, you are right, there are lots of savings to be made, lots of money that is wasted but do not lump us all into the same rotten basket.

We are ALL part of your community and lots of us make an effort to do something for it. Your comments and that of the person who wanted to slash the level of 'non-bona fide Falkland Islander's are nothing short of out and out racism!


Teacher's anger at sniping at contractors

Immigration: the pros and cons Electoral law gets a shake up

IS IMMIGRATION good for the Falkland Islands economy

This was the question discussed Executive Council last week.

Members considered a paper on Migrants and the Economy prepared by the Economic Adviser, Mike Harte.

In his paper, Dr Harte says that immigration is a contentious political issue in nearly every developed country and "...conflicting evidence about the benefits and the costs of immigration exist to support supporters and detractors of immigra-tion." The paper looks at theoretical and practical aspects of the immigration debate, focusing on two key questions:

 Do immigrants create an economic loss for Falkland Islands born residents?

Do immigrants cost the economy more than they contribute to the economy?

Acting Governor Harriet Hall said Dr Harte's paper will be published, "...so that members of the public will have the chance to discuss the issues raised and form their own views.'

She added, "Councillors all agreed on the importance of economic growth, but also felt that it was important that the disadvantages of population growth shouldn't outweigh the benefits.

"As one person commented, if the settlers of the 1840s had closed the gates of the Falklands in the mid-nineteenth century, how big would the economy be now? And how many people would there be

"Does a larger population mean that each individual has a smaller share of pie or do they create a bigger pie, enabling larger shares all CHANGES are to be made to the electoral law.

The request for changes from Executive Council followed a general review undertaken by the Attorney General.

Acting Governor Harriet Hall said, "Perhaps the most significant of these is to make a provision that people who have been away from the Islands for up to five years in order to obtain a professional qualification or other experience for the benefit of the Islands should remain eligible to vote.'

Miss Hall said that other changes include matters, "...such as ensuring that future bye-elections for one constituency can be held with ballot boxes available in both constituencies (although obviously only members of the relevant constituency can vote); allowing planes carrying ballot boxes to carry passengers, mail and freight if appropriate; and specify that the date on which a person must qualify to be eligible to vote is the date on which the application for registration is made, rather than the current practice of specifying you must have been eligible on the preceding 15 March.

considered Members also whether to allow postal voting, but considered that the timings of the election process would make this unworkable.

"They did however wish that provision should be made to enable electronic voting, should the technology make this a suitable option at some stage in the future.

No resources for conservation project

COUNCILLORS have considered a request to support a project which other South Atlantic Territories wish to put forward for European Union

St Helena, Ascension and Tristan da Cunha wish to apply for funding for a project to work on the eradication of non-native species from the Falklands - for example, rats, thistles and foxes.

Miss Hall said, "Whilst Councillors were happy to support the project in principle, they made it clear that they would not be able to agree to any Falkland Islands Government resources being used in support of the project.

"Individual landowners would also need to consent to work being done on their land, if the project went ahead.'

A NEW ordinance governing access to information is to be produced. Miss Hall said that, at the mo-

ment, access to information is governed by two documents, Committees (Access to Information) Ordinance and a Code of Practice on Access to Information.

She said, "Members considered two pieces of UK legislation - the Freedom of information Act and the Data Protection Act but noted the complexities of these laws and - es-

pecially in the context of the Data Protection Act, the lengthy preparation and Training which UK civil servants were undergoing to prepare for its coming into force. They therefore decided the time was not right for the Falklands to follow this path. However they noted that the two Falkland Island documents are not entirely compatible and as a result the Attorney General has been asked to prepare a new Ordinance to bring these two together."

Early illex closure: refunds to fishing companies

THE budgetary situation of the Falkland Islands Government was discussed by Executive Council but details will not be available until next month's Budget Speech by the Financial Secretary.

However, the Acting Governor did reveal that the poor illex season had been discussed and, "... councillors agreed that the Director of Fisheries should contact companies in-

volved in the illex fishery to discuss refunding a portion of this season's licence fees in recognition of the early closure of the fishery.
"Members also made the point

that as the Falklands was prepared to share the risk in this way with companies in a poor season, the Islands should also share the benefit in a good season.'

Plot guidelines for separated couples

Access to information - new ordinance

COUPLES on the list for housing plots who go their separate ways need a clearer policy to refer to, Executive Council has decided.

The Acting Governor com-mented, "There have been several cases recently where a relationship breakdown has had an impact on the allocation of government serviced residential building plots.

"For example, there have been occasions where a couple, or one member of a couple has had a plot

allocated, only for their relationship to end and which has left one partner unable to benefit from time they have spent on the waiting list with their ex.'

Miss Hall said Executive Council has discussed this on a number of occasions and the resulting policies will be available from the Environmental Planning Office and, ...made clear to all applicants for government serviced plots."

Members of Executive Council agreed on the importance of investment in and development of Goose

"...by members agreeing that this was community related and that therefore FIG should be prepared to provide Capital Funding for this

work.
"Accordingly £50,000 will be included in FIG's capital programme for next financial year."

Remembering Harold Rowlands April weather

HAROLD Theodore Rowlands CBE died in Stanley on April 17, 2004

Harold was born in Stanley on July 10, 1931, the youngest of three children of Conrad Rowlands and Lucy nee' Larson. His home throughout his entire life was the small house on Ross Road East built in 1879 for his grandfather, Captain Frank Rowlands, who arrived in the Islands as a shipwrecked Swedish seaman. Rowlands was an anglicised version of Rylander, his Swedish sur-

Harold went to school in Stanley, except for a short time during the Second World War when children and teachers were sent out to Camp. He and his brother and sister went to stay with a kindly aunt and uncles at Darwin, returning to Stanley to a home which also accommodated twelve soldiers of the Light Artillery while their barracks were being constructed

The war period was a time of excitement and adventure for the children. When the Boys Brigade, a popular youth organisation, was started by Captain McCubbins. Harold became a very keen participant and remained involved until adult responsibilities took up all of his time

He left school when he was fourteen years old, as was usual in those days, and started work at the Falkland Islands Company West Store. He worked at the West Store for a short time before moving into Govemment Service at the Treasury and Saving Bank in 1948. Hard work, a natural aptitude for accountancy, and an amiable, easy-going manner, meant that Harold progressed well at the Treasury, being promoted to Assistant Colonial Treasurer.

In 1971 the British Government signed a Communications Agreement with Argentina, cutting off all passenger traffic except that which passed through Argentina. As a result the incumbent Colonial Treasurer had to retire to New Zealand it was considered to be a diplomatically awkward for him to travel through Argentina as he had been Acting Governor when a group of Argentine hi-jackers forced a DC4 to land on Stanley Racecourse and had supervised their arrest and deportation. Harold took the post of Colonial Treasurer in April 1972 The title was subsequently changed to Financial Secretary

During the 1970s and early 1980s Government revenue was small, the total budget under £1m, and resources had to be carefully managed. It would not be unusual to see the Treasurer's light burning late into the night as Harold worked to finance the Falklands on a shoestring. Typically an evening's overtime at the office would be rounded off by a few hours of debate and gossip at the Working Men's Social Club. He was awarded the OBE in 1978.

While travelling through Argen-" period, tina during the "Dirty War Harold was arrested on the streets of Buenos Aires and spent a night in the cells. When asked to prove his identity next morning he produced a Falklands banknote with his printed signature. The bemused police officer released him.



When the Argentines invaded the Falklands in April 1982, Rex Hunt the Governor and other expatriate administrators were forcibly removed, leaving Harold, formerly a desk-bound civil servant, to face difficult decisions and onerous responsibilities. As the most senior Government official he had to cope with the fears and anxieties of the local population, and pressure and intimidation from the invaders.

Harold and his staff kept the Bank running throughout the occupation but refused to levy taxes. They managed to stall efforts by the Argentines to gain entry to the bank vault. Harold said he could not change over to the Peso currency. pleading old age and befuddlement and making much use of the word 'mañana.

The strain and overwork of those days and the immediate post-war period affected him for the rest of his

When British troops liberated the Falklands, the Port Squadron worked day and night to bring supplies ashore at the slipway in front of Harold's house. He invited them into his home to warm up by the peat fire, and for a drink or two, beginning a connection with the Troop which lasted for 22 years. They called him "Harry", or even "Harry the Forger" and continued to visit him after they moved to East Cove. becoming his second family; returning his hospitality when he visited East Cove, or travelled to Britain.

Their birthday presents were a source of amusement and pleasure -"Harry's Seat" by the Slipway was a constant reminder of their high regard for him. He had a reputation for never forgetting a name or a face.

His friendship with the Port Squadron lead to frienship with the crews of the small boats based at Mare Harbour. He had great affection for the crews of the *Indomitable* and St. Brandon and enjoyed their com-pany enormously. On arrival in Stanley they would, at times, steam up to the front of Harold's, heaveto, and sound the ship's horn to attract his attention. This had to stop after a reprimand from the Harbour Department.

One of Harold's proudest moments was standing on the Stanley Town Hall stage to present Mrs. Thatcher with the Freedom of the Falklands in 1983. After years of uncertainty, Mrs Thatcher's affirmative, unequivocal speech delighted everyone and Harold kissed her on the cheek

He retired in 1988 after 40 years of service and was awarded the CBE. He was elected to Legislative Council in 1989. He delighted in the Falklands new-found stability and prosperity, but after the completion of his four year term on Council was content to sit back and watch it hap-

Harold was an excellent storyteller and had a vast knowledge of Falklands history particularly the unwritten kind. He travelled widely and loved musical theatre and Ronnie Scott's Jazz Club in London.

A short, rotund man - some were reminded of Winston Churchill but, after a few drinks, Benny Hill seemed a more appropriate comparison. Those who knew him in his earlier days may remember Harold thundering past on a very ancient motorbike known as The Canonball, or speeding down an ice-covered Philomel Hill on a sledge.

Those who remember him in his later years would recall Harold, a huge smile on his face, belting out the lyrics of "Hello Dolly". A hard-working, humorous, warm, kind and generous-spirited man with complete integrity, he will be remembered by all who knew him with great respect and affection.

He was predeceased by his brother John and is survived by his sister, Betty Biggs, and numerous nephews

From the Mount Pleasant Meterological Office

APRIL was milder than normal. slightly wetter but with normal sunshine. Wind was also average, but more gusty for the time of year.

The mean maximum temperature for the month was 11.1 C against the average of 9.9 C. The highest recorded temperature was 16.2 C on the 6th, whilst on the 23rd the lowest maximum of 5.4 C was recorded.

The mean minimum temperature was 4.7 C against the average of 3.8 C. The lowest minimum of 0.1 C was recorded on the 30th. There was no night with air frost, the first air frost-free April since records began at MPA on 1987. There were six nights with ground frost.

Rainfall was slightly above average, with 61.6 mm against the norm of 54.1 mm. The maximum daily fall of 10.3 mm occurred on the 17th. There were 15 days with 0.1 mm of more of rain and 11 days with 1.0 mm or more.

Fog occurred on only one day of the month.

Snow/sleet fell on five days. however not in significant quantity to give a covering. Hail was also recorded on three days.

Total sunshine recorded was 118.2 hours, again very close to the norm of 111.2 hours. The maximum daily recorded sunshine was 10.2 hours on the 4th.

The mean wind for the month was 13.8 knots, which is near to the average monthly mean of 14.2 kts. Gales (34 kts or more over a ten minute period) did not occur. the third time no gales were recorded in April since records began in 1987

The highest gust recorded was 47 kts on the 9th. Gusts exceeding 33 kts occurred on 17 occasions. this is however above the average for April.

THE ranks of the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) were bolstered this week, when the latest batch of new recruits successfully completed their final pass-out exercise.

Exercise Swift Sting, held late last week, was the three day culmination of a two month training programme for recruits Nick Rendell, Nevan Middleton, Dustin Gilson-Clarke, Matthew Eccles, Zoran Zuvic-Bulic, Ross Poole and Sean Moffatt.

Enemy forces for the exercise were provided by members of the Joint Communications Unit from Mount Pleasant.

Permanent Staff Instructor at FIDF. Royal Marine W02 Nick Watson said the programme was designed to be, "...short but compact, squeezing in a lot of information in the minimal time." Emphasis was placed on what the recruits needed to know to take up a role within the close combat platoon."

WO2 Watson said the exercise, "Infollowed the doctrine of finding the enemy using the sniper/recce element, crushing the enemy's desire to fight by heavy weight of fire using the machine guns and 'finishing off' the enemy using the close combat platoon."

He said the exercise progressed well in some testing weather conditions and the recruits performed admirably. However he added, "__for most it was a huge learning curve, considering their age and limited experience. But their achievement was admirable

"The quality of instruction they have had from the skill at arms instructors inherent in the FIDF has been superb, they have really benefited from excellent tuition."

The recruitment progress was rounded off with a brief passing-out ceremony on Saturday evening. After addressing an audience of family and friends at the Drill Hall on Saturday evening. Acting Governor Harriet Hall presented the six recruits with their new FIDF berets.

FIDF Commanding Officer, Major Peter Biggs then announced the award of best recruit trophy to Sean Moffatt

W02 Watson said, "The decision for the best recruit was incredibly difficult due to the quality of all the recruits, who all 'brought something to the party'

"It was even suggested that no best recruit be nominated this year and instead an overall award of best section be given. The final decision was made by the recruits themselves who nominated one fellow recruit

"Sean has been highlighted for his diligence and unselfishness throughout the period; he and all the others are to be commended."

wo Watson said the FIDF continues to need men and women. Lo undertake combined and joint operations of war in order to maintain sovereignty of the government of the Falkland Islands.

He said criticisms of the FIDF as a Dad's Army outfit is. "...somewhat amusing.

"Even at my age I cannot remember Dad's Army having state of the art communications, world class assault rifles, machine guns capable of engaging out to 1800m, snipers capable of head shots at 800m, an amphibious capability, a manoeuvre capability and a structure that is able to harness the enthusiasm, dedication and professionalism of the FIDE."

He added, "Training will remain demanding but achievable to anyone who wants to commit themselves to a worthwhile and rewarding cause."

DAim for a win/win situation. □Wait until you're both calm to discuss things.



Recipes for the Falkland Islands Avocado and yoghurt dip

Ingredients:
2 to 3 shallots, coarsely chopped,

I small sweet red or white onion, coarsely chopped

1/2 small green bell pepper, coarsely chopped

2 tablespoons chopped green onion tops

2 large ripe avocados, peeled, pitted, and coarsely chopped 1-1/2 tablespoons fresh lemon

juice, or to taste

1/2 cup plain yoghurt, sour cream, or Creme Fraiche

1/4 cup mayonnaise I teaspoon crumbled dried dill or tarragon, or to taste

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon freshly ground white pepper

Coriander sprigs Tortilla Chips

Instructions:

In a blender or food processor, finely mince shallots, onion, bell pepper, and green onion tops. Add avocados and lemon juice and whirl until smooth.

Add yoghurt, mayonnaise, dill, salt, and white pepper. Whirl until smooth, then taste and adjust seasonings

Transfer dip to a shallow serving bowl, cover, and refrigerate several hours to chill thoroughly. Just before serving, garnish with coriander sprigs. Serve with tortilla chips. This dip should be kept no longer than 1 day. Makes about 3

Anchovy, mustard and sour cream dip

Ingredients:

3/4 cup mayonnaise

1/4 cup dairy sour cream

1 tbsp Dijon style mustard 2 tsp lemon juice

I clove garlic, minced

1/2 tsp dried thyme, crushed 2 ounces anchovy fillets (drained and chopped)

Vegetable Dippers: Halved baby carrot, mushrooms, pea pods, broccoli florets etc

Wool report - week ending April 30

GENERAL OVERVIEW

Greasy wool prices slipped across the entire micron range at sales in Australia during the week. Price falls were exacerbated by a decrease in the value of the Australian dollar relative to the UK pound and US dollar. Prices were also reported down in New Zea-

As shown in the attached Micron Price Guide, price falls were greatest for fleece wool lots between 22 and 28 micron and a little less at the finer and broader end of the spectrum.

Demand was widespread with strong interest from European as well as Chinese buyers.

British Quotations for Tops British top quotations generally followed Australian and New Zealand greasy wool markets and decreased in value. As shown below; World Markets

In Australia, large quantities of the wool available for sale were either withdrawn or not sold at auction as sellers and buyers struggled with differing opinions as to where they felt the market should be. Fremantle as an example saw 31.5%

of the 14,431 bales on offer passed-

A different situation was observed in New Zealand where only 93% of the 8.737 bales offered for sale in Napier, as an example, were

passed-in. The higher sale rates in NZ reflected the stronger market conditions prevailing for broader wool during the week.

Argentina promotes sheep farming recovery

ARGENTINE lamb exports this year jumped 61%, the price of wool doubled and sheep are returning to Patagonia but also to the pampas and the province of Buenos Aires.

Recovering sheep farming won't be easy because both sheep activity and sheep culture in Argentina were almost swept out during the nineties." warns Jorge Srodek, a sheep farmer and head of the Buenos Aires province Ovine Program.

Mr Srodek revealed that for several years now Argentina is implementing a sheep flock recovery plan investing annually the equivalent of seven million US dollars.

The plan is extensive to all sheep farming areas in the country and pretends to recover flocks given the encouraging profitability for lamb, mutton and wool.

The money is loaned to farmers. with no interest, and must be returned 'productively," that is a farmer with the credit who purchases fifty sheep, must in five years time return fifty healthy ewes. The loans can also be invested in genetic improvement and basic camp infrastructure.

At the beginning of the 20th century Argentina had a flock of 70 million sheep, mostly in the province of Buenos Aires. However cattle gradually pushed sheep into Patagonia and by the eighties the number had dropped to 22 million and even further in the late nineties to 12.5 million. Patagonia actually represents 65% of the Argentine flock and the province of Buenos Aires now has 1.4 million

why the chances of sheep farming resurgence, asks Mr Srodek, "because greasy wool prices in Argentina have jumped 200% since 2002, and also there's a growing demand for lamb." In the first quarter of 2004 Argentine lamb exports increased 61% totalling 8.6 million US dollars, mostly from foot and mouth free Patagonia that is certified to sell to the European Union

But there's also a demand from Brazil, Arab countries and South Africa," points out farmer Srodek adding that in some cattle auctions in the province of Buenos Aires, live lambs reached 1.15 US dollars per kilo, almost 50% more than steers.

Chile earthquake

A 6.3 MAGNITUDE earthquake shook southern Chile early on Monday causing power outages and minor property damage, but no injuries.

According to the University of Chile's Seismological Institute, the 48-second tremor occurred at 12:39 a.m. (0439 GMT) and was felt in six of the country's 13 regions, including the Santiago metropolitan area.

The Chilean National Emergency
Office (ONEMI) said the quake shook the regions of O'Higgins, Maule, Bio Bio, Araucania. Los Lagos and Metropolitan Santiago where six million people live.

The epicenter of the quake which caused temporary blackouts in the cities of Lebu, Contulmo and Cañete, was located off the coast of Cañete, some 320 miles south of Santiago

Recovering Falklands sovereignty: 'an indeclinable objective'

"RECOVERING sovereignty over the Malvinas Islands is an indeclinable objective of all Argentina and particularly for this administration. said Argentine Defence Minister Jose Pampuro during the ceremony to honour the 323 dead in the sinking of the battleship General Belgrano by a Royal Navy nuclear submarine May 2. 1982.

But, he added "...this will be achieved by peaceful means and in the framework of United Nations nego-

Mr Pampuro together with the Commander of the Navy Admiral Jorge Godoy, Commander of the Coast Guard Carlos Fernández, military officers, legislators, Malvinas veterans and relatives of the servicemen killed during the 1982 South Atlantic conflict participated in the ceremony held in the Argentine Navy main building, Edificio Libertad in Buenos Aires

"As we said last Saturday in Paranà to commemorate the fire baptism of the Argentine Air Force, we

are here today to renew testimony of an event that is so important for the Navy and for the whole society," emphasized Mr Pampuro.

Towards the end of the ceremony, Mr Pampuro said that honouring the heroes of the battleship General Belgrano has, "the explicit and permanent homage of all the Argentine citizenship towards this guest.

'Unfortunately we lost in the battlefield, but spiritually, in fortitude and in the continuation of Argentine tra-ditions it will be for ever engraved."

stressed Minister Pampuro.

Admiral Jorge Godoy in the official Navy message promised to keep, "...alive the flame." represented by the "...hero seamen of Malvinas."

General Belgrano was sunk by two torpedoes from HMS Conqueror on May 2 of 1982 during the South Atlantic conflict that began April 2 with the landing of Argentine marines in the Falklands and ended when the Argentine command surrendered on

Education remains priority in 2004/2005 budget plan

THE Education department will be among the last to take budget cuts, and there are no plans yet to make parents contribute to their child's school fees.

Following requests by the government for its departments to make budget savings, *Penguin News* contacted Chairman of the Education Board. Councillor Jan Cheek to ask if parents would be required to contribute to the financial cost of their child's education either within the Islands or at college and university level

Councillor Cheek responded, "The proposals for savings which went to the last Standing Finance Committee included some from the Education budget.

"Most councillors have, at various times expressed the view that the education and medical budgets should be the last to take cuts so I am hopeful that they will be true to their words when we finalise the budget later this month.

It is, however, impossible to

answer specific questions until after the budget session."

Mrs Cheek said the greater part of the Education budget is salaries. "...so there are few options for savings if we are to continue to offer a well resourced broad curriculum and relatively small class sizes.

"The director is always quick to recommend savings when an opportunity arises, as for example, when a shift in camp population allows the recruitment of fewer travelling teachers."

Mrs Cheek added, "I firmly believe that the higher and further education budget is an investment for the future and in the long term is reducing our reliance on contract officers.

"I have not seen any proposal for a parental/student contribution to fees except where a student has not satisfactorily completed a course or in other extraordinary circumstances, for example if the course is not within our normal guidelines." In a restructuring programme at the Department of Agriculture, four posts have been reduced to three.

The creation of the jobs of Senior Agriculture Advisor, a Wool Production and Animal Reproduction Advisor and a Livestock Husbandry and Grazing Management Advisor mean the positions of Beef Advisor and Wool Advisor no longer exist.

Addressing concerns that the wool industry could be neglected by the loss of the Wool Advisor, Director of Human Resources. Kathleen Dobbyns said, "The Senior Agricultural Advisor will continue to advise on wool matters."

tinue to advise on wool matters."

She added, "Appointments have been made to fill the other two

posts.

"Both candidates are very well qualified to carry out the broader range of work required in the job descriptions and there is no reduction in advice for farmers on wool production."

No new radio manager

IT HAS been announced that the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station (FIBS) manager's post will not be filled when Lisa Riddell leaves at the end of June.

Chief Executive Chris Simpkins yesterday confirmed, "Informal discussions have begun with a view to transferring the operation of FIBS to the Media Trust and, in order to enable options for different future management structures to be kept open, it has been decided not to fill the post of Station Manager that will become vacant when Lisa Riddell leaves.

"This will have the added advantage of reducing government expenditure at a time when all expenditure is under close scrutiny."

Responsibility for the management of the station will pass to Claudette Anderson. Clerk of Councils, on a temporary basis. Mr Simpkins said, "Broadcasting policies will remain unchanged and continue to be applied by station staff."

Petrol price rises twelve pence per litre


THE PRICE of petrol increased by a massive 12 pence per litre this week.

ALTHOUGH I am not someone who is normally prone to depression, my spirits certainly took a tumble with the cold weather we've had this week.

After the stunning three months of sunshine which kicked off the year, I've been struggling to adjust to the bone and soul chilling conditions which have heralded the arrival of winter.

I've found myself not so much with a spring but a shuffle in my step, and some mornings I've wondered if getting out of bed and facing the cold is really worth my while. Top that off with the general pessimism and bitching that is communicated to our office on a regular basis, and it's all too depressing for words.

In an attempt to inspire some enthusiasm in me the other day, a friend suggested a rather original money saving move for the government to try; it took the form of a cruise vessel, large enough to accommodate two and a half thousand people, which could move the population around the Islands, dispensing with Stanley altogether.

And here in the Falklands, despite our lack of poverty and unemployment, we always find something to moan about - be it the state of the economy, the level of immigration, or even the weather.

So I'm going to have to shake myself out of this state and make a winter resolution - to start counting my blessings and cheer up. We're not alone in our cold winters and in general we live in a pretty special place.

An e-mail from a friend in Japan this week illustrated to me the importance of looking on the bright side and appreciating the community we have.

He said many people in Japan complain about the deterioration of their country's caring fabric but a little story from him illustrates that this is far from the case: "I left a wallet containing a little over a thousand dollars, a digital camera and a cellular phone on a city bus. The bus company telephoned me to say that a high school student had found it and handed it in.

"Even when I tried to give 20% of what was in my wallet to this good citizen, he refused it and said. 'Don't worry about it!"

He concludes. "My Japanese colleagues and friends are forever saying, that the country is dangerous, and becoming like countries overseas - basically going to the dogs.

"I have yet to see what it is that they are talking about especially as all of them often leave their houses unlocked and don't hesitate to leave their car motors running while they run into the shops."

Sound familiar?

He could be writing about the Falklands - well, discounting the cell phone (and the bus for that matter), but you know what I mean.

We have a special place to live and it's time I for one started appreciating it more.

So there'll be no more grumbling from me...well, for this week anyway.

After all, how could we have an editorial column without the occasional moan?



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Could chartered ship bring veterans to inauguration?

ARGENTINE war veterans are considering chartering a ship to travel to the Falklands for the inauguration of the recently finished memorial at Darwin. "...if the Islanders won't allow us to charter a flight."

Argentine newspaper Clarin this week reported that Héctor Cisneros, president of the Relatives of the Malvinas Fallen Committee, confirmed contacts with the British Embassy in Buenos Aires to formalise their request to inaugurate the Darwin Memorial no later than September, "...although first they must convince the reluctant Islanders.

"If the Islanders won't allow us to charter a plane we'll find a way of chartering a vessel."

On Wednesday Councillor Mike Summers said no approach had been made by Argentina for the inauguration to take place. He said, "...you can't just come and carry out some exercise in someone else's territory without a formal agreement about how and what is being done."

Regarding the possible chartering of a ship, Mr Summers said, "To my knowledge, a cruise vessel doesn't require a series of complicated agreements. But they would clearly require all the normal immigration processes."

However he added. "There have been dozens of pieces of speculation and until someone in some kind of authority makes a formal proposal, we can't really respond."

According to Clarin, the

Malvinas Relatives Committee is planning to send at least one next of kin member for each of the 649 Argentines killed in the 1982 conflict, plus special guests, adding up to over 700 people. The transportation of this number "_would be impossible to achieve with the regular Lan Chile weekly flight that stops once a month in Rio Gallegos."

Clarin says that Islanders are furious with the Argentine government for having banned charter flights from Chile, crossing Argentine air space, and therefore strongly oppose Argentine next of kin flying to the Islands in air charters.

However the press also indicates that the whole operation to the Islands, including transport, lodging and food is extremely costly and currently there are no financial resources.

The only similar operation to this took place in 1991 when the first visit of Argentine next of kin to Darwin cemetery was held, organised by the Red Cross and flying from Chile in a chartered aircraft. The total number of travel-

lers then was 354.

The Argentine memorial near Darwin was provided for in the July 1999 Agreement signed by Argentine, British and Falklands representatives.

The memorial, designed and built in Argentina, and later assembled in the Islands AWG (Falklands) Ltd was mostly financed by Argentine tycoon Eduardo Eurnekian

She said the government must bear this in mind when determining levies on cruise visitors cruise companies do feel the Falklands are important but the government needs to be careful that it doesn't feel it can raise charges unrealistically.

"It is imperative that we remain competitive with other similar destinations and continue to provide and improve existing facilities."

In December 2003, charter

flights used for passenger exchanges in the Falklands were banned by Argentina.

Ms Summers said although cruise companies wish to keep coming to the Falklands."...the charter flights have a lot to do with this; they are the crux of the industry.

Councillor Richard Cockwell attended the IAATO conference for this reason. He said, "Councillors thought it would be useful for a govemment representative to be there due to the possible political implications on the charter flight issue.

A meeting was held for interested parties at the end of the conference. Councillor Cockwell said, "A proposal was produced which the operators have gone back to look at; it may enable them to carry out at least some passenger ex-changes in the Falklands, however there is much discussion needed before the situation becomes clear."

Ms Summers said two companies have already decided to advertise itineraries which include Falklands passenger turnarounds in their brochures however, "...most are sitting on the fence, keeping an eye on what happens

Councillor Cockwell said he found the industry was, "...very positive about the Falklands as a destination...I found it very encour-

Ms Summers echoed this sentiment: "There is a lot of support for the Falklands; people want to carry on using us for passenger turnarounds

She said one hurdle faced by visiting ships is the need for landing ramps at some of the more remote destinations. She explained, "For example, some of the ships want to go to San Carlos but can't land there.

"They need more landing ramps that tenders can be used

Becky Ingham of Falklands Conservation also attended the Christchurch conference

She gave a presentation on mitigation work to prevent seabird mortality which has been partially funded by IAATO

Ms Ingham said Falklands Conservation's participation in the conference was beneficial as it gave her the opportunity to, "... investigate the possibility of working with expedition leaders and the cruise industry in the next stage of albatross and petrel conservation work.

The visit was also a financial success for the charity. Ms Ingham secured 1,000 sales of Falkland Conservation's book A Visitors Guide to the Falkland Islands.

Investigating aquaculture potential



FIVE Falklands business people are in the Shetland Islands this week, investigating the potential of

Director of Fisheries, Dr John Barton and General Manager of the Falkland Islands Development Corporation, Mr Julian Morris, are travelling with fishing industry representatives Mr Hamish Wylie, Mr Simon Hardcastle and Mr Stuart Wallace.

Last week, the Falklands were represented at the Brussels Seafood Expo (above); this week the five have examined seafood processing plants and fish farms in Shetland and will carry out similar work in Ireland next week.

At the end of next week, the group will break up and attend various meetings and functions including industry shows Aquaculture 2004 and Fishing 2004 in Glasgow.

Falklands: A prospectors dream?

AN AIRBORNE survey which will determine just how vast the quantities of gold and other precious minerals are in the Falklands is nearing completion.

The aeromagnetic survey is being conducted by Fugro Airborne Surveys using a Brazilian Cessna 400 aircraft, crewed by 4 Brazilians, who defied an Argentine Government ban, and found their way to the Falklands, via Southern Chile and Cape Horn. (Buenos Aires currently refuses permission for flights to fly over its air space enroute to the Falklands, other than the scheduled weekly Lan Chile service.)

The Brazilian aircraft is surveying some 14,000 sq km of Falklands' territory, generally operating at 500m intervals. However in three key areas the aerial survey is far more intensified, with 250m flight line spacing being conducted. These areas include Mt. Usborne in the north of East Falklands, Glorious Hill in Lafonia to the south, and the Warrah and Mt. Robinson areas on the north-west of West Falklands.

Managing Director of the Falk-land Islands Company, Roger Spink said the aeromagnetic survey was, .. progressing satisfactorily, despite some early technical problems"

Once the results of the aeromagnetic survey have been analysed, Falklands Minerals Ltd will begin land based drilling in the areas identified by the aerial survey. This work could start as early as the austral summer of 2005, and is expected to provide employment for many Islanders.

Geology shows that the Islands were once part of South Africa, where vast deposits of gold are mined. If, as expected, considerable quantities of precious minerals are discovered on the Falklands, then the Islands could become a prospector's dream. MP

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Hotel for sale - if the price is right

THE UPLAND Goose hotel, which accommodated senior Argentine Military officers in 1982, and then welcomed British journalists accompanying the British Forces who liberated the Islands, is on the market.

Managing Director of the Falkland Islands Company (FIC) Roger Spink, confirmed that the Company, "... would be prepared to sell if the right offer comes along."

Although Mr Spink would not confirm a price, it is anticipated that something in excess of half-amillion pounds might tempt the FIC to make a deal.

Soon after Argentine Forces occupied the Islands on 2 April 1982, senior military officers moved in and leased rooms from the then proprietor Desmond King.

Late in the afternoon of June 14, the British journalist Max Hastings claimed the free drink which Mr King offered, "...to the first British reporter to walk into the hotel."

The King family later sold the hotel to the fishing company Witte Boyd, who in turn sold on to the FIC, who had previously owned

the hotel before selling to the

The famous old hotel, which dates back to the mid-19th century, will temporarily close down at the end of May while a programme of refurbishment and repair is undertaken.

Mr Spink said, "It is not cost effective to operate during June, July and August as sales around this time of the year are very poor."

Now around eight staff members will be forced to look for other employment when the hotel, which does not form part of the main core activities of Falkland Islands Holdings, the FIC's parent company, closes on May 31.

"Of course we regret having to lay-off staff but there is no other choice," insisted Mr Spink.

The FIC are currently advertising for, "...expressions of interest from organisations wishing to lease or manage the hotel."

Mr Spink explained that this move is to enable the hotel to reopen for the summer season, but the Upland Goose could change ownership if the right offer materializes MP.

HMS Sheffield remembrance



A MEMORIAL service for *HMS* Sheffield has been held on Sea Lion Island.

Representatives from Mount Pleasant, including the Commander of British Forces, Air Commodore Richard Lacey, the Chief of Staff, Group Captain Andy Dey and the Captain of HMS Leeds Castle, Lieutenant Commander lain Lower gathered at the HMS Sheffield Memorial last week to attend a service led by Reverend Paul Sweeting.

HMS Sheffield was the first ship of the Task Force to be attacked by the Argentine forces in the Falklands war. She was hit by an Exocet missile, which ignited fuel tanks amidships.

After nearly four hours of battling to save her, the Captain gave orders to abandon ship.

Twenty members of her crew died and others were injured.

The Commander British Forces and Naval Commander Chris Bourne laid wreaths during the service on the exposed cliff on Sea Lion Island and a piper from the Royal Highland Fusiliers, Cpl Willoughby, played a lament to remember those who lost their lives on HMS Sheffield

New complaint system at the KEMH

THE HOSPITAL is to make complaining easier for patients.

A complaints form is to be drafted by the Director of Health Norman McGregor Edwards and will be available from the hospital reception.

A proposal for a complaints form was presented by lay member of the Health and Medical Services Committee on Monday. Mr Jason Lewis said some people feel uncomfortable writing an official letter of complaint or meeting with hospital staff face to face to complain.

Mr McGregor Edwards was against the idea of a form consisting of simply 'tick boxes' but said it would be useful for a complaints form of some sort to be held at reception. This way, he said, patients could complain "there and then" which he described as a "useful" facility.

Patients will still be able to complain in the usual way, through writing a letter or in person at the hospital.

Mr McGregor Edwards told the committee that the hospital receives approximately 20 complaints each year.

He said this is a "...valuable procedure," at the hospital. "We welcome complaints - the more complaints we get the better. Not because it means things are going wrong, but we have been able to make changes in certain areas as a result of complaints."


the period of the contract.

UKFIT works on many projects

IN THE article "Development Corporation's 'pro-active and customer focused' work" on Page 6 of PN 23 April it is stated that over £200,000 has been invested (in the United Kingdom Falkland Islands Trust) in learning about shelter belt provision and scawced, intimating that this is all that has been done by the UKFIT over the past ten years. This is far from the case.

As is well known, the Trust has worked on a number of projects over the years, many of which have been initiated by the Trust and then taken on by FIG.

These include research on kelp harvesting as liquid fertiliser; making valuable contacts for the establishment of an aquaculture industry; research on soil improvement including an in-depth study on the processing of by-products from the abattoir, the need for which has recently re-emerged; vegetable growing trials; development of the concept of both organic development and the marketing of organic products; the selection and provenance of tree species; the development of tussac as a source of animal feed and erosion inhibitor; research on calcareous base materials; research on grains and

grasses: consultancy on aerial mapping; the development of a comprehensive science database for the Islands; and work on a number of civic projects including improvements to the Memorial Wood, setting up of the Alexandra Wood at Port Howard, help to school projects and support to repainting of ships names on the Camber.

Most recently the Trust has investigated the potential for commercial Paeony production in the Islands with work on production underway with small trial plantings now in the Islands - it will be 2 years until we see the results with the first production.

Furthermore, the Trust has actively promoted the scientific and development potential of the Falklands at many key national and international events.

Funds permitting, the Trust hopes to continue its work, much of which relies on voluntary effort by its dedicated band of trustees which we believe has brought tangible benefits to the rural economy of the Islands and which could be even more important in the future.

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Insurance tailored to Falklands' needs

THE Falklands can look forward to insurance policies tailored to its needs, the Managing Director of insurers Caribbean Alliance be-

Ernie Letby was in the Islands last week for a four day whistlestop tour. His company was registered as an insurer in the Falklands in December 2003.

Mr Letby, who is based in Antigua, first visited the Islands last ...to see whether we could provide the services that the Falkland Islands need.

Having done that, he said amendments were made to legislation to allow Caribbean Alliance to operate in the Islands and the company's operation began in December, in conjunction with the Falkland Islands Company. He said this most recent visit was a, "... follow up now that we're up and running and to see the problems at the local office, what extra facilities they require and what policies the Falkland Islands require.

The FIC insurance agency has been in operation for approximately 113 years and Mr Letby said the operation was good. However he added. "There are problems in terms of the coverage that we offer: We have to be sure that it fits in with what you require down here, because you are slightly different.

He explained, "You have conditions which aren't really strong in other parts of the world. One of the basic principles of insurance is that the losses of the few are paid by the many, and it's very true down here because your claims experience dictates what your premium experience is going to be.

"We don't base this on what we charge in the UK or what we

charge in Antigua. It something peculiar to the Falkland Islands and the Falkland Islands benefit be-



cause their loss experience really is very good."

Mr Letby said his company is offering liability insurance for tour operators. He said, "You have a tourism product here which is blossoming and that is something new to the Falklands.

"The big thing on tourism insurance is the liability aspect for visitors, so we have laboured to develop a policy and we are still developing it. But we are offering the coverage for people who are involved in the tourism product."

Mr Letby described insurance rates as "quite competitive" and he says his company has "no reason"

to put up the rates. However he added, "The only thing that probably will evolve over the next few years is a levelling rate. Whether a man has got a hazardous occupation or whether it is a sedentary occupation, they seem to be charging the same premiums and over time that's not reasonable; there should be some extra charge which might then benefit the other people. It will be more appropri-

ately rated.
"But there's no intentions to simply sit here with a monopoly and increase the rates.

He said the company intends to introduce comprehensive motor insurance on commercial vehicles and to alter marine insurance. He explained, "The insurance that was

available before was in respect of a full year twelve month policy with a stipulation that in January, February and March you had to take the vessel out of the water.

'It's simply based on the northem hemisphere; now we're allowing for the fact we're in the southern hemisphere and therefore, not going to give that sort of restric-

He assured that Caribbean Alliance wishes to provided, "...policies better tailored to what is required in the Falkland Islands."

Caribbean Alliance Insurance Company was registered in St John's, Antigua in August 1988. Originally a subsidiary company of the Royal and Sun Alliance Insurance Group, it is registered to do business in ten Caribbean islands in addition to Ascension Island and the Falklands.

Mr Letby said providing insurance to islands presents its own challenges. "Each Island is different - whether it be by landscape, people or occupations.

The big threat in the Caribbean is that it is a catastrophe area. We have hurricanes, we recently had the volcano eruption and the earthquake risk is always there.

"Even though we are a small company, the strength of any company is its reinsurance programme." The reinsurance brokers for Caribbean Alliance are HSBC Insurance Brokers

Mr Letby said he plans to have a representative of his company visit the Falklands at least twice each year.

On a personal level he said he found the Falklands, ' friendly, hugely interesting and He left the Islands very unique." on Saturday.

Museum seeks old stories and other pieces of history

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A day at sea on HMS Leeds Castle

PENGUIN NEWS' intrepid reporter Sharon Marsh spent a 'Friends at Sea Day 'aboard HMS Leeds Castle last week. Here she recounts the day's activities.

TWELVE visitors to HMS Leeds Castle eyed each other up in the wardroom on Wednesday morning, wondering who would be the first unfortunate soul to suffer from seasickness

Howling gales dominated the previous day and the thought first and foremost in everyone's mind was undoubtedly the heavy swell expected to be running on our short journey from FIPASS in Stanley around the east coast to Mare Harbour.

The present Leeds Castle is the second to bear the name and was launched in October 1980. Serving with distinction during the 1982 conflict she acted as a despatch ship between the Falkland Islands. South Georgia, and Ascension Island.

An honest, moving and often humorous account of this period is contained within the pages of the then Commanding Officers diary, a copy of which is held by the ships office.

Lieutenant Commander lain Lower welcomed the group onboard and gave a brief talk on the role of the ship in the Falklands and its capabilities. He also mentioned the poor weather the day before and said a fairly heavy sea was expected, causing this particular visitor to blanch considerably.

HMS Leeds Castle has now been in the Falklands for four years and is due to return to UK in September of this year. The ship boasts, "...the largest flight deck in the fleet, but no hangar," and is also the, "...envy of the rest of the fleet," for its electronic charting system. This system could eventually result in a "...paperless bridge," and will be the primary navigation system on the

And so with the help of the *Indomitable* we left FIPASS and sailed up the harbour until opposite the 1982 War Memorial when officers

completion of trials

and crew saluted before turning and leaving the harbour. Once we were clear of the outer harbours and Cape Pembroke a man overboard exercise was held

A dummy called 'Fred' was thrown over the side of the ship and the alarm raised. The ship was very quickly turned around in a full circle bringing the unfortunate Fred onto the port side and into shelter created by the ship.

An inflatable boat was prepared for launch while swimmer OM Smudge Smith, suitably attired for the freezing cold waters and secured to the ship by a rope, swam to Fred and guided him to a stretcher which had been lowered over the side. Fred, the swimmer, the inflatable and its occupants all safely on board again very quickly we resumed our journey.

By now the wind had dropped away to a very pleasant ten knots and all fears of any form of sickness were a dim and distant memory, which was a good thing as lunch was next on the agenda.

Having had the opportunity to meet a number of the crew and quiz them about their jobs. I think it takes a special type of person to spend their life at sea but it is evident that members of the Royal Navy are passionate about their vocation.

As one officer enthused about the ship and his work he said, "...a day not at sea is a day wasted."

Soon we were nearing Mare Harbour and the officers gathered on the bridge for their entering harbour brief

Under the guidance of Navigator Vince Owen with Coxswain Cheyette and LMAS Barney at the helm we made our way into the harbour until. three cables from the jetty, Lt Cmdr Lower took continand of the ship and, with the aid of the Indomitable, bought her gently alongside

The HMS Leeds Castle is commencing her tour of settlements and the outer islands this week so she will become a familiar sight to those living in camp.



Report of the May 6 meeting of the Planning and Building Committee

THIS month's meeting of the Planning and Building Committee showed much private sector confidence in the future with the submission of no less than twelve applications for new houses by couples, individuals and one local building company.

This was almost certainly a record for such business at a single sitting of the Committee, and which was considerably longer than many of the previous meetings lasting, for the open session of the agenda, five minutes short of two hours.

Chaired by the Honourable Norma Edwards, in the absence of the Honourable Richard Cockwell who was away on other government business, she was joined by the Honourable Stephen Luxton, Gerald Cheek, Les Harris and Mike Harris.

Apologies in addition to those of the regular Chairman were received from Mike McLeod and Paul Phillips, the latter having now resigned his membership. Antony Lancaster's apologies were also noted as he was away from the Islands on overseas leave. One other member of the public was present in addition to the writer.

In matters arising from the minutes of the last meeting, members were invited to approve a statement to Executive Council on their behalf prepared by the Building Adviser, Jim Robison, following the appeal by Robert McLeod against the condition imposed on the planning permission for the erection of a tilt-over mast at 75 Davis Street.

Considerable discussion followed as several members felt the concerns over possible interference from equipment served by the mast should be left to the Licensing Authority and therefore the Post Master. It was

agreed that a paragraph be added to the statement suggesting that ExCo might wish to consult that Authority when reaching a decision on the

As indicated, this was to be a very busy meeting: no less than twenty-four applications were to be considered for planning permission and the Building Adviser, in addition to presenting these in the absence of Antony Lancaster, also reported on twenty-five applications for building permits of which only four had to be deferred for lack of sufficient information.

Before looking at new proposals, members examined two submissions seeking renewals of temporary planning permission and agreed to extend both for a further two years: the Portakabin sited at the Falkland Islands Museum for the storage of exhibits, and the phone booth and footpath on Monument Hill, Ross Road premises of Cable and Wireless. Next, Robin Fryatt's application for permission in principle to erect a television studio and office facility at Gordon Lines was refused due to lack of the information which had been requested from the applicant. He had in the meantime sought consent to site a container housing some equipment at FIDF's premises, and Jim Robison was asked to speak to Mr Fryatt to hasten an application for the necessary consents.

New Applications

Not necessarily in the order in which they were reviewed by members of the Committee, the following applications for planning permission to erect dwellings received conditional approval: one-and-ahalf-storey house to the rear of 66 Davis Street for Andrew Alazia; a terrace of three houses to the rear

Stewart Construction Limited; David Peck's house at 5 Sulivan Street; Derek McGill's house at 11 Sulivan Street: a house at 4 Anderson Drive for Naomi Summers; Marc Short's house at 7 Anderson Drive; a pair of semi-detached dwellings at 7 Sulivan Street for Mr and Mrs Plato and Mr and Mrs Yon; a house at Plot 37 on Fitzroy Ridge, East Falkland, for Paul and Karen Ford; and Alex Olmedo's house at 6 Anderson Drive. Additionally, David Clarke got conditional permission to site a Portakabin for use as accommodation at the Frying Pan on East Falk-

Other works approved conditionally included the following: a sunhouse at 20 Ross Road East for Jim Moffatt; FIG's submission for a toddler's play area on St Mary's Walk; the change of use from office to dwelling at 32 Fitzroy Road for Karen Steen; an extension to his garage at 8A Brisbane Road to form a shed for Alex Jaffray; alterations to the generator and workshop facilities at the KEMH for FIG; the replacement of timbers and windows to the "Listed Building" known as the Central Store in PWD's Dockyard submitted by PWD; access alterations at 5 Short Street by Mike McLeod; and Joan Clarke's proposal for a garden shed at 9 Murray Heights.

Two submissions had to be deferred due to lack of adequate detail: the proposed change of use from a shop to office and tutorial rooms at FILO on Barrack Street for John Fowler and Larissa Fava; and Stanley Sports Association's proposals to provide improvements to the existing drainage to Stanley Racecourse.

Jackie Jennings and Alan White's

proposal to install a new staircase at Pebble Lodge on Pebble Island was adjudged not to require planning permission as the works were internal. The building permit side of the submission was, however, given approval.

There were two applications before the Committee for Off-Street Parking Grants. In the case of Andy Brownlee's proposal for works at his dwelling on 19 Ross Road East, this had to be rejected as it was outside the "core area". However, Kevin Connolly's application in respect of works at 1 King Street was given approval.

Before concluding the meeting, members were invited to consider an application to relax the building regulation requirements and allow combustible material on an external wall of a proposed extension to the dwelling at 2 Moody Street. This would be in excess of that permitted by those Regulations. Jim Robison's report was considered and it was agreed to accept his recommendation to relax the requirement.

This was the last meeting that Jim Robison would be attending as he has now completed his contract and will be leaving the Islands later this month. The Hon Norma Edwards passed on the Committee's thanks for his help and advice over the past two years and wished him well for the future. A new Building Adviser has yet to be appointed but in the meantime it is hoped that Graham France will be covering until such time as a new appointee arrives.

The next meeting is to be held on Thursday, June 3, 2004 commencing at 9am in the Liberation Room at the Secretariat.

Diabetes and how it is treated

DIABETES is a common health condition; about 1.4 million pcople in the United Kingdom are known to have diabetes - that's about three in every one hundred people.

There is an estimated one million people in the UK who have diabetes but do not know it.

Diabetes is classified into two main types, of those who are known to have diabetes; over three quarters have Type 2 diabetes and one quarter have Type 1 diabetes.

Type 1 diabetes develops when the insulin-producing cells in the pancreas have been destroyed.

Nobody knows for sure why this happens but research has shown that the most likely cause is a viral or other infection, which causes an abnormal reaction of the body to the cells.

This type of diabetes generally affects younger people and both sexes are affected equally

Type 2 diabetes is sometimes called maturity onset diabetes because it usually appears in middle aged or elderly people.

The main causes are that the body no longer responds normally to its own insulin or that the body does not produce enough insulin. People who are overweight tend to develop Type 2 Diabetes and it can be hereditary.

There is no cure for diabetes but it can be treated successfully; the comerstone of all treatment for diabetes is a healthy diet - low fat, low sugar and high fibre. This is of course the diet that everyone should be eating to remain healthy. The diet should also include at least five portions of fruit or vegetables each day.

People with Type 1 Diabetes need to inject insulin each day as well as keeping to a healthy diet.

Insulin cannot be taken by mouth as the digestive juices in the stomach destroy it. There is a lot of research being done to find al-ternative ways of giving the insulin but at present it is still necessary to inject it.

Type 2 Diabetes are treated by diet but if this is not sufficient then there are several types of tablets

which can be prescribed to enable the pancreas to produce more in-

When people are treated by diet alone they often say that they have got mild diabetes but there is no such thing - you have either got diabetes or you haven't got it.

Type 2 diabetes may not be diagnosed initially, indeed it is often when you attend the doctor for some other problem that it is diagnosed, for example re-occurring abscesses, leg ulcers, urine infections, heart attack, high blood pressure, stroke or even visual problems picked up by the optician.

Over the last ten years the care of people with diabetes has improved dramatically.

One of the most important developments has been improved methods of screening which help your doctor to pick up health problems at an early stage so that they can be treated more successfully.

Winter recipes for the Falklands

Beef and beer stew

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 3 pounds lean beef
- 4 cups sliced onions
- 4 cloves garlic, minced 1 cup water 2 beef flavoured bouillon cubes
- I teaspoon thyme
- 2 cups dark beer
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- I tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 2 tablespoons corn flour, mixed with equal parts water

Heat butter in a large skillet and brown the beef. Place browned beef in a slow cooker.

Add onions and garlic in the skillet to brown lightly, and then place them into the slow cooker with the beef.

Add the water, beef stock cube. thyme, beer, brown sugar and mustard to the slow cooker.

Cover and cook on low for 5-7

Add corn flour mixture to the stew and continue to cook until thickened, about 20 minutes.

Serves 8.

Bean and Pasta Soup

Ingredients

l tablespoon vegetable oil 1/2 pound minced beef I large onion, chopped I clove garlic, minced

I packet dry vegetable soup mix I cup water

2 cans chopped tomatoes

1 can red kidney beans, drained 1/4 cup uncooked pasta shapes

Heat oil in a large stockpot over medium-high heat.


Crumble minced beef into pot and cook, stirring frequently, until well browned. Remove meat, leaving excess oil in pot.


Cook onion and garlic in oil over medium-high heat until translucent.


Stir in tomatoes, kidney beans, vegetable soup mix, and water. Reduce heat, and simmer 40 min-

Wool report - week ending May 7

GENERAL OVERVIEW

Greasy wool prices slipped for all fleece wool lots between 19 and 30 micron at sales in Australia during the week, but were more variable at sales in New Zealand.

Prices improved in South Africa, principally as a result of a weakening in the value of the "Rand" relative to other major cur-

As shown in the attached Micron Price Guide, price falls were generally of magnitude 5 to 8 pence per kilogram clean.

British Quotations for Tops

British top quotations generally followed Australian greasy wool markets and decreased in value for tops finer than 30 micron. As shown below;

World Markets

In Australia, large quantities of the wool available for sale were either withdrawn or not sold at auction. Of the 73,858 bales actually offered to the trade, 55,596 bales were purchased with 24.4% passed-in.

Included in the offering were 4.852 bales of crossbred wool, of which 3773 bales were sold and 21.4% passed-in.

Ammonia explosion leaves 67 injured

THE EXPLOSION early on Monday of an ammonia tank in a Korean jigger moored in Montevideo left 67 people hospitalized of which five are in comas, 19 in intensive care units and the rest with different degrees of intoxication.

The worst accident of this kind in Montevideo's port also let loose a cloud of ammonia gas that spread in a radius of a square kilometer covering other moored fishing vessels and a vast adjoining area outside the terminal's perimeter.

The Uruguayan Fire Department and Montevideo port naval authorities are investigating the cause of the explosion of the 1,000 litre tank in the Sung Kyung 201 which arrived in Montevideo at the end of April.

A team of firemen, called earlier to rescue an injured crew member who had fallen into the hull of a ship, were the first to arrive at the scene of the explosion and also suffered from inhalation of ammonia

Minutes later, when the main force of firefighters arrived equipped with masks and oxygen tanks they began rescuing the injured crewmembers and helping others that were isolated in the remaining fishing vessels berthed side by side next to the Sung Kyung 201.

"It was a very big explosion, almost at two in the morning followed by the formation of a huge toxic cloud," said Ricardo Levy spokesman for the Uruguayan Fire Department.

The most logical hypothesis is that there was some problem with the tank's valves, but we'll have to wait for the investigation," added Mr Levy who revealed that ammonia leaks are common in refrigerating systems, "but certainly not of this magnitude."

All sea traffic in the port area was interrupted until mid morning fearing that because of the explosion some crewmembers could have ended in the water. There was also a warning for people to keep away from the area.

The rescue teams used oxygen to help speed the dissipation of the toxic cloud.

Ammonia gas is particularly dangerous for the skin, eyes and respiratory system causing blindness and death by intoxication since it can produce irreparable damage to the lungs

Argentina arrests Uruguayan jigger

A URUGUAYAN flagged jigger. Young HWA 99 was caught last week by the Argentine Coast Guard fishing in the South Atlantic with an expired licence.

The jigger was carrying twenty tons of squid when she was surprised fifty miles from the port of Quenquen and 300 miles south of the city of Buenos Aires.

According to the Argentine Coast Guard the 46 meter long jigger has a crew of 28, half of them Uruguayans, the other half Asian.

Following the detection, "_we ordered the vessel to stop and personnel from Azopardo completed the inspection, confirming the existence of the (squid) cargo and the expired fishing licence." said Carlos Fernández, commander of the Argentine Coast Guard.

Young HWA 99 was escorted to Mar del Plata where the case was analyzed by Argentina's Minister of Interior and Justice, Gustavo

The documents of the vessel are not for fishing but rather for prospecting operations," said Mr Beliz

The vessel remains under arrest and its haul has been confiscated.

The fact that the Argentine Minister of Interior and Justice was personally involved in the fisheries incident was interpreted in Montevideo as new evidence of the current, "... difficult relations," between the two neighbouring coun-

Two ships return from South Atlantic

TWO ROYAL Navy ships returned to Portsmouth within hours of each other after long deployments to the South Atlanlong

Ice patrol ship HMS Endurance ventured further south than ever before during work periods off Antarctica, while Type 42 destroyer HMS Glasgow steamed 28,000 miles protecting the UK's interests in the region and carrying out goodwill visits to a number of ports.

Endurance - known as the Red Plum because of her distinctive red hull - undertook a heavy programme of survey work for the UK Hydrographic Office around South Georgia, and helped the British Antarctic Survey by moving significant amounts of aviation fuel on to the Antarctic ice shelf.

WOI Carl Carter, who has made ten tours of duty to the Falklands and who travelled to the Islands to represent the Regiment at Mr Rowland's funeral said, "I would like to wish his family all the very best for the future and may our new-found friendship last."

WO2 Steve Nicholls, a veteran of the Falklands War who presented a park bench to Mr Rowlands in 2002 as a gift from the Regiment, also attended the memorial service.

The hymns "I vow to thee my country" and "Abide with me" were sung. "Hello Dolly", a favourite of Mr Rowlands' was played at the end of the service.

Budget session

THE annual budget session of Legislative Council takes place next week.

The two day meeting will be opened on Tuesday at 9.15am beginning with a guard of honour from the Falkland Islands Defence Force. His Excellency the Governor will give his annual Address to the Nation before leaving the meeting.

Shortages in Camp after Tamar crane breaks

WEST FALKLANDS residents are once again running short of supplies—due to delayed and cancelled voyages of the coastal shipping vessel *Tamar FI*.

A spokesperson for the Fox Bay-based West Falklands Co-op, the main store for West Falklands, said that supplies of, "...milk, sugar and many other food stuffs are desperately low."

The spokesperson explained that as, for some time, Fox Bay has been included on every trip by *Tamar F1* to the West, "...we don't tend to order such large quantities of each item."

However the settlement has not received supplies since the first week in March and residents are now trying to prepare for their annual charity fundraising sweep draw next weekend.

This event traditionally swells the population, as crowds gather for a 'two-nighter' at the Southern Cross Social Club. However the Co-op spokesperson says that supplies of rum and vodka are also very low, "...certainly not enough for the weekend."

Port Howard residents faced a fuel shortage earlier this week when supplies became worryingly low.

Farm manager Rodney Lee confirmed that he had borrowed fuel from the Public Works road gang's supply as, "...we were getting to the point where there would have been houses running out at the end of this week and power not too long after that."

Mr Lee is unsure when his farm will next receive a visit from *Tamar FI* but hopes it will be, "...before we get short of fuel again." He added, "It is a shame when one weak link in the chain can cause the whole operation to suffer."

Operations Manager at Island

Shipping Jason Morris told *Pengum News*. "We are aware that people on the West are running low on supplies and will endeavour to service everybody's requirements as soon as possible."

He explained that the *Tamar's* last voyage (V409) had to be cut short due to a breakdown with the deck crane.

He said the spare parts for the crane have been procured from Norway and are now with Island Shipping's agents in Punta Arenas awaiting Saturday's flight.

Mr Morris assured, "... engineers will work through the weekend to effect the repairs and we would hope to have the ship back out early next week.

"The remainder of the ports to be serviced on V409 have been added to V410 to avoid any further delay in reaching the affected ports."

OUR letters pages haven't been short on back biting and sniping of late so it was particularly gratifying to print several letters this week full of praise for individuals and even a government department.

It couldn't have happened at a better time for me as I was starting to feel pretty desolate about the fact that people are so quick to find fault with others - whether it be the way our government is run, or that Joe Bloggs may dare to make a few quid more than anyone else.

The fact is the opportunities available in the Falklands are endless. There is probably very little need for anyone to be employed in a job they don't enjoy - there's plenty of choice and no unemployment, and lets face it noone is exactly destitute. The much used axiom, 'tightening of the belt', for most of is literal in that through our comfortable lives we have managed to gain a few more pounds and the belt is indeed tightening!

If you see a contractor earning more money than you doing a job you would love to do what is there to stop you from gaining the relevant qualifications and experience and applying for the job yourself? We've got the internet so Open University is an option, and there are training programmes, further education and night classes constantly on offer. And don't even try

that old adage, 'I'm to old' - you're never too old to learn.

Take a look at FIGAS - who would have thought we could have a department which demands a high level of professionalism and expertise operating predominantly on the skills of Falk land Islanders. This concept was something way beyond the realms of anyone's imagination twenty years ago, I'd be prepared to bet. Some of them had to go back to school to get where they are - proof indeed that if you want something bad enough it is worth working for, so don't just sit back and criticise others for getting on with the job - start working towards it yourself.

It's easy to sit back and criticise- we are all guilty of passing comment at how government money could be better spent, so why don't more people stand for council?

Ultimately we know that those who are serving, are doing a better job than we could. Even more honestly, who would want to give up such a huge chunk of their lives to a job that demands such commitment, almost every spare moment you have and at the end of the day very little thanks for what you achieve. Add to that a wage that a lot of people can earn annually without the merest hint of responsibility and the sleepless nights spent wondering if the right decision has been made, and I doubt many people would stand for election.

In 1993 twenty-five candidates stood. It's a hell of a job to cast your vote when there is such a choice, (I have a difficult enough time deciding between organic and normal tomato sauce). But then, there was a seven million surplus to the budget that year and looked like there was plenty more where that had come from.

We have to be honest and admit mistakes. How many of us can hold up our hands and say that we have never wasted money when dealing with our private finances?

This stash totals only a few hundred quid, but compare the size of the budgets and it probably equates to a defunct calcified seaweed crusher or a specialist fishing net that didn't quite do the job - bigger budgets, bigger lofts. (Isn't life simple when you've got blonde hair).

So, lets not be so quick to bitch about the way things are done just for the sake of it. Obviously councillors are there to deal with problems and want to hear from their constituents but for every time we complain about something lets also try to find something to praise - you won't actually have to look to far.

If you are not, happy with your lot, don't whinge and make everyone else miserable - do something about it.



Rethink over Newhaven specs

THE requirements for the Newhaven terminal are to be revised, the Transport Advisory Committee (TAC) has agreed.

Councillor Stephen Luxton updated members on the discussions of the Newhaven working group which led to the estimated cost of £2-3 million per terminal.

Mr Luxton said the meeting, "...discussed issues surrounding the design specification and it was agreed that the requirements should be revised and the working group should investigate alternative options.

"Given that the (coastal shipping vessel) Tamar is unlikely to service the Islands for many more years, these options will include a more suitable vessel for combined coastal shipping and cross-sound operations."

Three extra weekend trips home each year may be allowed for children living in Stanley House hostel

Father of three, Michael Alazia from Port Edgar, appealed to the manager of the Falkland Islands government Air Service, Fraser Wallace, to provide a flight to camp on a Friday afternoon, allowing hostel children a weekend at home.

The suggestion was discussed by the TAC on Tuesday and Councillor Steven Luxton said, "...it was established that the practical element of arranging an afternoon flight to suit on only three days a year would not be a major problem, so it will be referred back to the Education Department with that information."

A number of items were discussed in the exempt part of the TAC meeting and Councillor Luxton outlined these.

He said, "Three provisional options for Camp road funding allocation were discussed, as the amount of funding available for new road building will be reduced for the coming season as part of budget cuts, though the actual road programme remains unchanged.

"Members had a long discussion about this issue and agreed one of the options presented."

He said, subject to the draft budget being approved next week, the favoured option includes:

- both the Public Works Department West road gangs are to be retained, albeit at a reduced level of funding

- replacement of the bridge at Little Chartres

- a substantial capping operation commencing on East Falkland - funding to be made available for allocation to private contractors for the coming season. ("The allocation of this to individual contractors will be done at a later meeting once expressions of interest have been invited and bids received.")

The TAC also discussed the likely cost of renovating the Hill Cove Jetty, and a provisional cost estimate for that work. Councillor Luxton said, "A report is already being prepared on the business case for spending a considerable amount of money on a main West Falkland jetty when the settlement is already connected to the road network, and this will be the subject of a future paper to TAC and then Executive Council at a later date."

Also considered by the meeting was correspondence. One letter was from a farmer requesting an amendment to the road programme and one concerned the coastal shipping service.

Mr Luxton said, "The latter item generated quite an animated discussion and members of the committee will be following up on concerns expressed."

'Nitpicking ' leads to more rules - Summers

"NITPICKING by some members of the public" is to blame for a change to the government's committee rules, Councillor Summers believes.

At a meeting of the Falkland Islands Development Board on Tuesday, Councillor Mike Summers said a direction had been received from the Government Secretary stating that matters arising from previous minutes of meetings should only be discussed in committee meetings if they are on the agenda.

Mr Summers commented,

"Many of us find this unnecessarily restrictive and overly bureaucratic. The reason. I understand, is that members of the public should be entitled to know what's going to be raised at open meetings beforehand.

" It's unfortunately a result of some nitpicking by some members of the public in the past as to how meetings have been run."

The new addition to the to the government's committee rules will be presented to the next meeting of Legislative Council.

Death of former Falklands postmaster

IT IS with sadness that we report the death of former Falklands postmaster Mr Jim Stephenson (68) last week.

Mr Stephenson died in the United Kingdom at Charring Cross hospital, following a short illness.

He first came to the Falkland Islands from the United Kingdom in the 1950s to work as a meteorologist for the British Antarctic Survey He later joined the government as a forecaster then, after the Falklands War, he carried out a number of jobs including income tax officer and camp teacher, before working at the post office until his retirement approximately seven years

Mr Stephenson was cremated in the United Kingdom yesterday morning. His ashes will be returned to the Falklands.

DESPITE a poor turn out, discussion flowed at the latest public meet-

ing hosted by the police.
The panel comprising the Chief of Police Dave Morris, Inspector Len McGill, Sergeant Dave Roberts and councillors Jan Cheek and Stephen Luxton took questions from five members of the public.

The meeting began with a presentation from Superintendent Morris on the Force's Policing and Development Plan.

He addressed accusations that the police force is overmanned with its seventeen full time officers and a number of reserve constables. He said this number is required to guarantee 24 hour cover and to secure an immediate response to 999 emer-

gency calls.
When asked if, in order to make budget savings, redundancies might be made, holder of the police portfolio Councillor Jan Cheek said this was not an option. She said savings would be made through "natural wastage," such as not replacing staff who

Spt Morris said this natural wastage would mean a reduction to the level of service and sergeants may have to cover duties to continue the 24 hour coverage. He said, "I do think the public would be worried if we didn't have 24 hour cover.'

Sergeant Dave Roberts explained the DARE (Drugs and Alcohol Resistance Education) programme. He said the programme, in addition to equipping children with the skills to resist drugs and alcohol, has improved the relationship between the police, schools and parents.

The programme has recently been extended to include younger and older children. Young children are taught about general safety, both in the home and outside, while older children are learning about more adult topics, such as sex and alcohol.

On the topic of licencing, Inspector Len McGill said he believed the court's use of banning orders had been "very effective". He said the banning orders were proving an effective deterrent to trouble makers in public houses.

Finally, a general discussion took place about seatbelts. The panel welcomed the move to enforce child restraints and discussed the importance of drivers and passengers alike wearing seatbelts.

Injured sergeant returns to United Kingdom

A MEMBER of the Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) team who was injured in an explosion late last week has left the Islands.

At 11.30am on Thursday, May 13, an incident occurred at York Bay Range during preparation for routine EOD training.

Sgt Chris Fuller a Royal Engineer based at Hillside Camp, was preparing a pyrotechnic charge which ignited inadvertently causing superficial facial and hand burn injuries.

A military spokesperson said, "First aid was immediately carried out at the scene and he was moved to KEMH casualty department.

The incident coincided with the end of Sgt Fuller's operational attachment in the Falklands and he returned to the UK on May 18.

An internal military investigation into the incident is currently underway

Court news

Youth told 'sort yourself out'

A YOUTH was given a twelve month conditional discharge and ordered to pay a contribution towards prosecution costs yesterday after he pleaded guilty to underage drinking.

The court heard yesterday that the boy's friend had stolen a bottle of vodka from his sister's room and the pair had met in the house and drunk half of the bottle before going to Michele's Café.

There they had met up with more friends and went back to the house and consumed beer and more vodka before going out again.

Crown Counsel Graham Cripps said that the police became involved after one of the youths had appeared obviously drunk He had returned to the place where he was staying where he had, "... a bad night causing difficulties for the lady who was looking after him," Mr Cripps said.

The defendant told the police he had permission from his dad to drink but his dad said he meant only "a couple of beers" and not vodka.

Senior Magistrate, Mr Nick Sanders took note of the youth's history with the police in alcohol related matters, the last being in May 2003 where he was given a citable caution for underage drinking

for underage drinking.

He told the youth: "It's not big or particularly clever to get into trouble like this" and advised him to sort himself out. L Hazel

Family fued lands woman in court

A WOMAN has received a conditional discharge in court after an altercation with her niece.

Prosecutor Graham Cripps told the court that while in a drunken state. Cherry Robson (44) attempted to end a long-running family feud by talking to her niece in a toilet cubicle in the Globe Tavern. However Ms Robson became emotional, agitated and later abusive and her niece feared for her safety.

Defence lawyer Hugh Ferguson said his client was trying to resolve the family issue but her judgement was clouded by alcohol He said his client was very upset about the incident.

The Senior Magistrate, Mr Nick Sanders, told Ms Robson she had done herself, "no favours" and issued her with a twelve month conditional discharge

Ms Robson will also pay £70 prosecution costs.

Two men had their cases adjourned this week.

In court on Wednesday were Gabriel Ceballos and John Hirtle, facing respective charges of assault and drink driving. Both cases were adjourned until 2pm today (Friday).

Check insurance before test driving

REMEMBER to ask about insurance before taking a car for a test drive.

That was the lesson learned by two Fisheries Department colleagues this week.

Ruben Ureta (41) was test driving a vehicle owned by Emma Jones (31) when police stopped the pair on Biggs Road.

It was later discovered that Mr Ureta was not in fact insured to drive Ms Jones' vehicle. In court on Wednesday, both admitted that they had failed to obtain insurance for Mr Ureta before he took the vehicle for a test drive.

Both had wrongly assumed he was covered by the vehicle's insurance policy.

Ms Jones said the episode had reminded people working for the Fisheries Department, which often employs people on short term contracts, to ensure they have insurance before buying or selling a vehicle.

The Senior Magistrate said he believed the offence was the result of an "oversight".

However he fined Mr Ureta and Ms Jones £175 each and ordered them both to pay £50 prosecution costs.

Appeal against disqualification is rejected

ROBERT STEWART had a request to have his driver's licence returned to him rejected.

Mr Stewart received a seven year driving disqualification in December 2000.

As he had completed half of the disqualification period, he was entitled to ask for his licence back.

However the Senior Magistrate told Mr Stewart he should wait a little longer.

He commended Mr Stewart's good behaviour in recent months, in particular his progress in staying away from alcohol.

However he said it was too early to give Mr Stewart his licence back.

Falkland Islands Holdings buys into ferry company

FALKLAND Islands Holdings (FIH) Plc has bought a piece of the Portsmouth Harbour Ferry Company PHFC) public limited company as a long term investment.

The ferry company was established in 1883 and operates a ferry service across Portsmouth Harbour between Portsea and Gosport and also owns a travel agency.

The Falkland Islands Company also has a long history of providing a service to a local community having been established by Royal Charter in 1851.

At present, FIH's earnings and assets are almost exclusively related to its activities in the Falkland Islands. A statement issued by the company this week said, "As part of its stated strategy FIH has been looking to diversify its activities outside the Falkland Islands.

"PHFC offers a long term investment opportunity in a sector which has a number of comparable features to FIH's business. As a result FIH will improve the spread of its assets, its risk profile and scope for future

Study proves Pilgrimage's benefits

THE results of a study carried out to evaluate the benefits or otherwise of a pilgrimage to the Islands to a group of veterans who served in the Falklands War has been published.

The subjects of the study by Task Force Psychiatrist Surgeon Captain Morgan O'Connell was a cohort of 209 Pilgrims who travelled to the Falklands where they spent a week in 2002. Questionnaires were distributed en route with follow-up questionnaires submitted eight months after their return. One hundred and eighty-four pilgrims responded to the follow-up questionnaire.

In his report Mr O'Connell writes, "Ninety-five (52%) of the Pilgrims were identified as 'cases' en route. At follow-up 66 (69%) of these were no longer identified as cases." He concludes, "Going on Pilgrimage is beneficial to the psychological well being of the Pilgrims."

He writes of eight "special' Combat Stress clients specifically chosen for an additional pilot study aimed at identifying the benefits or otherwise of more formal preparation for and support during the actual Pilgrimage. These eight were predominantly Welsh/Scots Guards.

Mr O'Connell reports, "Of the

Mr O'Connell reports, "Of the eight special Combat Stress clients, all responded to the two questionnaires. All were 'cases' at initial screening. At follow up, five of the eight were no longer cases (62.5%). Of the three remaining who were

still cases, two were considerably lower in their scoring (25-136 (17-8)."

While recognising the cost and level of organisation involved in the 2002 Pilgrimage, Mr O'Connell says the benefits make it worthwhile. "The visits to the battlefields and memorial sites allowed considerable grief work to be undertaken, meaning to be attached to the events of 1982 and a sense of relief that, not withstanding the cost, it had all been worthwhile.

"In other words, a 'wrong doing' had been confronted and the outcome had produced an improvement on the situation that had previously prevailed. In support of this last statement, one needs only to visit the Falkland Islands and see what the community has done with the freedom restored to them.

Mr O'Connell pays tribute to the support of Islanders for the veterans. "The support from the Falkland Islands Government and in particular the population of the Falkland Islands cannot be overstated.

"Not only did the indigenous population (many of whom of course were veterans in their own right), take us into their homes where they extended superb hospitality, but they also turned out in large numbers to support us in various aspects of the programme as battle sites and memorials were visited. For example, on the day of the formal visitation of the War Cemetery at Blue Beach, some 94 off-road vehicles turned out to support the Pilgrims."

Development Board notes loan guidelines

THE Falkland Islands Development Board (FIDB) has "noted" but not adopted a model guideline to evaluate farms for loans.

It was decided that the guide would be used in conjunction with individual factors in each case for people wishing to purchase a farm.

It was stressed that the model was intended to calculate the security value based on the farms performance, as opposed to the market value.

A discussion on the door locking system adopted since the rearranging of FIDC offices revealed that many visitors were unhappy with the system which leaves visitors standing in the outer porch without clear instructions as to how to enter the main building.

Chair of the meeting, Councillor Summers felt it was, "...over the top," and, "...made FIDC unapproachable when it needs a friendly

face."

The Director of Agriculture's report revealed that there will be just over 2000 ewes to receive AI treatment and 364 will have embryo transplants. Polwarth is the predominant breed being used followed by Cormo, Dohne Merino and Texel.





Secrecy claim is rubbish

HOW we envy Sarah Davies' her wisdom (PN-7 May). However, such wisdom is very easy after the event and from a position in the hills from which descending to the valley to kill the wounded after the war is over is a simple manoeuvre.

Trivialised criticism of (relatively junior) civil servants acting under instruction and in strict accordance with the requirements of established procedures (General Orders) that are based on a model in operation for many years in a number of British Overseas Territories, reveals a lack of understanding which Mrs Davies would have been wise to have researched before she adopted the role of executioner.

Allow us, if you will, to illuminate (confuse?) the scene with a few facts:

- 1. The allegation of a cover-up is outrageous. The fact that an internal inquiry had been established to investigate irregularities in recording the use of controlled drugs at KEMH is a matter of public record (PN September 5, 2003).
- 2. Prior to the investigation commencing, a nurse, Ms Schophaus had been suspended (PN September 5, 2003).
- 3. In view of the very clear advice of the Investigating Panel (PN October 24, 2003) that:

(a) while a quantity of controlled drugs could not be properly accounted for, and

(b) while it was clear that there was a partial absence of satisfactory systems of accounting for controlled drugs;

(c) there was no evidence that any of the approximately twenty staff of the hospital who could have had access to the controlled drugs in question had stolen or otherwise misapplied the drugs, the Attorney General advised that the systems of accounting should be brought into compliance with the legislation without delay, but that, in view

of the investigating panel's report, it was not appropriate to launch a criminal investigation by the police.

4. As a result of the inquiry, procedures for the control of drugs were urgently improved — it was this that led to the recent conviction of Ms Schophaus because it produced the firm evidence which had previously been lacking.

5. Officers of the UK Inland Revenue are highly trained investigators. Our confidence in the ability of Mr Eccles to lead a team and carry out such sensitive investigations is undiminished although his willingness to respond positively to such requests in the future must now be diminished.

6. It is not FIG acting through its servants, who are guilty of a cover up. But if the hospital authorities in the UK, and indeed South Africa, had been open about their suspicions, the employment of Ms Schophaus would not even have been contemplated. She too is a victim of that failure.

Finally, we must briefly comment further, and in general terms, upon the allegation of secrecy within FIG. It's rubbish! We suggest that it would be difficult to find a more open system of government but there are many issues that cannot, for very sound reasons, be the subject of publication at certain times.

Executive Council has given a commitment to introduce a new ordinance to improve clarity about what government business is, and is not, open to public access but our experience is that, in fact, confidentiality is very difficult to maintain here and the diddle-dec telegraph usually creatively fills any gaps!

THE museum is hosting a special display to celebrate the anniversary of Stanley's small but busy airport.

For many years the only method of travelling outside the Falklands was by sea.

This option was withdrawn in 1971, and lead to a formal communications agreement between the British and Argentine governments to operate an airlink between Stanley and Comodoro Rivadavia.

Initially the Grumman HU-16B Albatross amphibious aircraft provided a service on a weekly basis. This ungainly monster would sometimes use Rocket Assisted Take-Off (RATO) packs to help it into the air.

The same political agreement also allowed the Argentines to build and operate a temporary airport at Hookers Point. Built from aluminium planking the runway came into service in November 1972. The Fokker F27 Friendships were introduced and operated from the runway until 1978 when high winds tore up large sections of the aluminium planking leaving the runway unusable.

In the meantime UK Company Johnson's Construction had been awarded a contract to build Stanley Airport and the Airport Road with the first drainage works beginning in 1974.

Many Islanders were involved with the building as subcontractors and these years proved to be quite a boon for the local workers earning the higher wages offered by the company. Additionally many of the workers learned operating and engineering skills that would be beneficial for future projects.

When completed, the runway was 4,000 ft long and 150 ft wide.

Stanley Airport was officially opened on Tuesday May 1, 1979 by Sir Vivian Fuchs. The first official landing recorded was by Jim Kerr piloting Bill Luxton's Cessna 172 with Stephen Luxton and the late Terry Reive as passengers.

However some months before, local pilot Robin Pitaluga heard that an Argentine F27 was to make a trial landing on the new runway and promptly pre-empted the possibility with a landing in his own light aircraft, making a Falklands registered aircraft the first to touch down at the new airport.

On the evening of April 1, 1982 it became known that an Argentine invasion force was approaching the Falklands. The runway was barricaded with heavy machinery and vehicles in an attempt to stop aircraft landing.

Under Argentine occupation the airport suffered extensive damage as did FIGAS aircraft and private aircraft owned by Robin Pitaluga, Bill Luxton and Rex Hunt.

From June 1982 to May 1986 the Royal Air Force operated from the airport which became known as RAF Stanley.

RAF Stanley ceased to exist on April 30, 1986 when the military moved to the purpose built RAF Mount Pleasant.

Temporary aluminium planking was removed to reveal the original 4,000 ft runway and by April 1987 Stanley Airport was nearly back to its pre-war state.

For several years in the early 1990's the Chilean airline Aerovias DAP flew a fortnightly service between Stanley and Punta Arenas using twin otter and King Air aircraft These flights were replaced with the Lan Chile service flying into Mount Pleasant.





Cleaning up South Georgia



THE 2003/2004 summer season at South Georgia was a busy one, with a concentrated effort on cleaning up Grytviken.

Here, Operations Manager for the South Georgia Government, Gordon Liddle, writes of the work carried out on the southern island.

WORK began at Grytviken in September 2003 with a small party of ten men going ashore with considerable amounts of plant and equipment.

Their first task was to build the accommodation camp that would hold the main part of the work force. This was expected to take four weeks and the camp, complete with generators, power distribution, two man cabins, kitchen freezers etc was ready as planned. It took extraordinary efforts by the team to do so as the construction was not as simple as expected and some damage had occurred in transit to the Falkland Islands.

In October the main party arrived, bringing the man power for the project to about forty. A specialist decontamination unit was built for the asbestos removal team and the real work began.

The intention was to remove asbestos, oil residues, old gas cylinders, possible polychlorinated biphenyls (PCB) contaminated oils and other hazards from the station site. The remit was to leave it in a reasonably safe state for future visitors and to leave as much of the workings of the station as was compatible with safety.

The work continued successfully from October and a great deal was achieved. It proved necessary, in order to gain safe access to the asbestos, to remove quite a few of the sheds and buildings but by no means all. Where that happened the machinery in the buildings has been retained. This has resulted in the possibility of seeing much of the main part of the processing system from the plan area without having to enter dark and unsafe structures.

The asbestos removal was completed before the end of the season, as planned. It was removed by a specialist contractor under the supervision of independent and qualified UK inspectors. Thus the work was done to the highest UK standards and continual air monitoring showed that at no time did

any person become exposed to asbestos risk.

The asbestos itself was treble wrapped in heavy polymer material and placed in a landfill site then buried to the best UK specification. This had required a recee visit during the previous Austral summer to ensure that a site could be identified that met the required specification.

The areas where asbestos was buried are accurately mapped and marked to prevent any future development that could cause it to be exposed again

The next major task was to remove all the heavy oil residues from the bulk storage tanks on the station and to raise and clean the ships *Petrel, Dias* and *Albatros*

Once again, specialists were required to work on the ships. Many readers will know that the *Petrel* had been floated and had subsequently sunk again on several occasions. The *Dias* had been part submerged for nearly thirty years and the *Albatros* even longer.

All three ships were raised starting with the *Petrel*. Her bunkers were basically empty but a small amount of residual furnace oil was removed from her. The big excavator on site was then used to dig away a small part of the shore in front of the normal *Petrel* position at the former slipway and she was drawn forward until her keel was level with a flat area of sea-bed and her bow hard against the shore.

She was then stabilised by putting beach material around her bow and about a third of her length back. Water was pumped into her so that she lies on the bottom in a fully upright position but always above the highest tide so that her decks can remain above

The Dias was next to be raised and this was a much more difficult task due to the very thin plate on her hull and the many holes that were found in her. Divers worked constantly for a week or more to patch her hull sufficiently to pump her and bring her to the surface. It was achieved successfully and her tanks were then cleaned out.

Our salvage consultant on site said she was so thin she could not be towed out of Cumberland Bay; the only other way to move her further is with a lifting ship. I mention this because her history as a steam powered trawler, her active service in the Great War and much in between before her final days in the scaling business and as a

supply vessel at South Georgia makes her a very valuable old lady indeed. There are hopes that she could be fully restored in her home port of Hull, (she was built in Beverley, I believe) and various people there are working to discover what the financial implication might be and if money could be found. Ian Harte and Dr Robb Robinson would appear to be the main protagonists in that research.

Finally, I was fortunate to see the Albatros come up from the bottom. I like to think of myself as a tough old (actually quite young) former FID of a stoical Scots nature but I confess to some emotion as, after two weeks of patching and hard work by the divers, she was finally pumped out and slowly, so slowly, broke the suction in the mud that held her and gently rose to the surface.

Congratulations are due to Lyle Craigie-Halkett the salvage consultant and to the captain and crew of the salvage tug *Luma* as there were many problems and moments of concern but all went exactly according to their plans in the end.

Within a few days many tonnes of mud had been removed from her, she was safe for the cleaning team to enter properly and her tanks were then cleaned until there was more grease on a good breakfast. Alhatros is so frail that she could barely be moved at all but both she and the Dias are now lying in similar fashion to the Petrel alongside the Harpon Jetty as they have done for years. The difference is that they both sit proud and upright, again on the bottom but always above the highest tides and stabilised by scree quarried from the surrounding slopes.

Dias could be easily freed and moved if that is decided to be desirable and achievable. It should be noted that there is still asbestos inside these ships as cleaning the boilers would require removal of much of the plate of the ship and thus effective destruction.

We did not consider that in any way acceptable so the hulls have been sealed up to prevent asbestos escaping or people getting access to it by going inside. If more remediation is to be carried out this work could be done in a proper dry dock facility.

There is historic correction revealed by this recent work on the Alther of them had been deliberately scuppered as has been written in so

many books. They had no places where deliberate water ingress could have occurred. It now seems fairly certain that accumulated snow melt caused them to sink.

While the salvage team were working on the ships, the main party ashore were engaged in cleaning out the old bulk storage tanks. These had been emptied to the normal outflow level previously but still had up to a foot of oil in the bottom of them. They are vast tanks and so a foot or so can be many tonnes.

After opening them and air sampling to ensure that men could work in them, teams of very robust chaps got in there and began literally to shovel the thick glutinous mess into wheel barrows, push them toward a hatch and tip it into an open top square tank carried on the forks of a telehandler. This was then taken to the shore, tipped into another tank where it could be heated and pumped in the salvors fuel barge.

This gruesome work was done in almost continual shifts and went on for weeks. It was completed with no complaints from the workers (or not too many) and, despite collapsed roofs, heating coils and other debris, without accident to them or to the environment. We now know that these big tanks are empty of heavy fuel oils. The old oil tailing pits that lay behind them were dug out and the area filled with clean materials.

The last items to be addressed were final asbestos clearing, the old gas cylinders and oils that could have contained PCB's. The oils were tested for PCB's and found to be free of them so that was one major worry removed; the gas cylinders are now vented and empty and we now have a site certified clear of asbestos hazard.

The main contractor on the project was AWG Construction Services (Falklands) Limited. This project was carried out under a partnering arrangement with the Government of South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands.

The principal sub contractors were, Layne Boytec as specialist asbestos removers. Thames Laboratories from the UK as specialist asbestos inspectors, Ultragas from Chile as salvors. The salvage consultant was Lyle Craigie-Halkett and the Government representative on site was David Peck, both of whom are Falkland Islanders.



The spine and associated problems

THE SPINAL column commences at the base of the skull and finishes in what appears to be the remnants of a small tail bone at the base of the

The spinal column is structured such that one vertebra is stacked on the next. Each is connected by a series of linkage joints and with an intervertebral disc separating each vertebra from the next. Each vertebra is made up of a solid part at the front and an enclosed arch at the back, so that when they are all connected. there is a tunnel formed by those connecting arches. The spinal cord passes down from the brain to the level of the low back, passing through this tunnel in the vertebral column and is enclosed and protected by it. There are nerves at the level of each vertebra which exit the spinal column to supply the body and limbs with sensation and to control all the corresponding muscles.

Each disc comprises a stronger outer rim with a softer central section. It is designed to be a shock absorber and to permit movement of one vertebra on the next.

The spinal column is divided into 5 sections. The Cervical spine is the neck, it is made up of 7 vertebrae. The Thoracic spine is the next section from the base of the neck to the mid back and is made up of 12 vertebrae. The Lumbar spine is the low back and it has 5 vertebrae - the Sacrum is the fused section which makes up the back wedge of the pelvis - and the Coccyx is the small tail bone.

The whole of this column is held together by a complicated series of ligaments and controlled by several layers of muscles

It is a complicated structure that has to hold the body upright and at the same time allow a degree of movement at the level of each vertebra whilst still protecting the delicate spinal cord. As a result of our upright gait, the spine now receives more strain and load then it was possibly designed to withstand. It is one of the most common mechanical regions of the body to give problems.

Here are some of the common problems with the spine that are likely to affect most of us at some time during our lives.

Disc wearing and strain With ageing, the discs begin to

wear thin and become more brittle. Unfortunately, this tends to occur in the spine more than most other joints and at an earlier age. Most people in their 40's and 50's are showing evidence of early disc wearing. This wearing predisposes the disc to strain and damage. The degree of damage can vary from a simple strain through to a ruptured disc. A rupture in the outer rim of the disc can allow the softer central part to protrude. This may often press up against one of spinal nerves passing right next to the disc.

Pinched spinal nerves

The nerves at the point at which they exit the spinal column, have very little clearance. It is relatively easy for the nerve to become trapped or pinched at this point. This will cause sharp pain along the distribu-tion of the nerve. Therefore a trapped nerve in the neck will cause pain, as well as other symptoms, down the arm to the hand. Similarly with a pinched nerve in the back. the pain will radiate down the legsciatica. Extra bone forming within the nerve canal, or a protruding disc. are the most common causes of this nerve root compression.

Strained or locked linkage ioint

The large compression and twisting loads that our backs have to endure can result in damage to the linkage joints that connect each vertebra with the corresponding one above and below. This will cause acute pain and restricted spinal movement A further common complication of this condition is protective muscle spasm where the muscles around the spine cramp up, usually with very painful consequences.

Strained muscle or ligament

Muscle pain near the spine is often associated with other problems arising from the spinal column itself. However localised pain and tenderness away from the spine can simply arise from a damaged muscle This problem will usually right itself. Ligament strains occur within the spine itself and can be more difficult to settle. These strains usually result from incorrect lifting or lifting weights that are too heavy.

Arthritis of the spine

There are several forms of arthritis that can affect the spine but natural wearing of the linkage joints and the associated discs is a frequent occurrence and could be termed as ageing. However, this wearing will weaken the spinal column and predispose the overall unit to strain. Osteo arthritis of the spine is termed spondylosis. This problem cannot be reversed or cured but there is much that can be done to control and manage the symptoms arising from this condition.

Scoliosis

This is the term for a sideways curve in the spine. When looking at the spine from behind it should appear straight up and down without any sideways deviation. A sideways curve can be a response to another painful condition of the spine causing the muscle to spasm and resulting in the spine being pulled to one side. Alternatively, the curve could be a structural problem that causes the spine to deviate. This often results from a growth variation that can occur during teenage years (more commonly in girls) A scoliosis in it's simpler form may not be painful, but it upsets the mechanics of the spine and places an uneven load through the spinal column. It is a condition that requires monitoring and treatment. Occasionally the curve can be so extreme as to render the whole column unstable and this will involve extensive surgery.

Structural variations of the spine

It would appear that nature has recognised the weakness with the structure of our spines and is experimenting with alternatives. It is not uncommon on X/Ray, to find structural variations in the shape and design of the spine. Some people have an extra vertebra, others have one less. Sometimes there can be extra bridging from the last vertebra to the pelvis. Sometimes the spinal arch has not completely formed or there can be a failure of one vertebra to lock in with the next, therefore allowing a forward slip. Not all of these variations need to cause symptoms. but quite often they can contribute to an already complicated set of circumstances

In conclusion, almost everyone will at some stage in their life, suffer with problems arising from the spine. Not many may be serious, but it is wise to have a doctor or physiotherapist assess your back or neck problem if the symptoms are severe or prolonged.

Wool report - week ending May 14

GENERAL OVERVIEW

Greasy wool prices slipped for all fleece wool lots between 18 and 32 micron at sales in Australia during the week, but were slightly higher at sales in New Zealand.

As shown in the attached Micron Price Guide, price falls were generally in the range of 4 to 6 pence per kilogram člean, except for fleece wool's of 21 to 22 micron where falls were only 1 to 3 p/kg clean.

British Quotations for Tops.

British top quotations generally followed Australian greasy wool markets and decreased in value for tops finer than 30 micron. As shown below;

World Markets.

In Australia 60,181 bales of wool were offered for sale. In total 52,500 bales were actually sold to the trade with 12.5% passed-in.

Included in the offering were 3,578 bales of crossbred wool, of which 2,984 bales were sold and 15.6% passed-in.



rising costs of treating chronic diseases such as coronary heart disease and diabetes. This does not include the contribution of inactivity to obesity - an estimated further £2.5 billion cost to the economy each year." What is the estimated cost to the Falklands Economy, we can only

"Being active is no longer sim-ply an option," states the report, "...it is essential if we are to live healthy and fulfilling lives into old

The recommendations for physical activity are supported by scientific evidence. For general health, a total of at least 30 minutes a day of at least moderate intensity physical activity on five or more days of the week reduces the risk of premature death from cardiovascular disease and some cancers, signifi-cantly reduces the risk of type 2 diabetes, and it can also improve psychological well-being.

The research demonstrates that the 30 minutes of physical activity necessary for health benefit can be built up in bouts of 10 minutes or more. For example, it can be made up of three 10-minute brisk walks rather than catching the bus for short

journeys

" Physical activity does not necessarily involve long hours slogging away in a gym, simply walking to work, walking the dog or playing a gentle game of short tennis would be enough to keep most people in the 'black' with respect to physical ac-

"The evidence also clearly demonstrates that achieving the weekly recommendation is not the preserve of the sports enthusiast. We all can and should be more active.

Gas crisis will stabilise in 2005/06 - Fernandez

"THE only thing we can do is feel ashamed, and apologise", said Argentine Minister of Interior Anibal Fernandez who defended Argentina's decision to limit natural gas supply to Chile, while at the same time admitting that there's no near end to the energy crisis.

Mr Fernández met the press this Monday in Santiago, Chile where he is participating in a Mercosur event.

The Argentine official talked extensively about the origin of the crisis but underlined that Argentina. ...will do its utmost," to avoid,

"...any conflict with the Chilean people."

Mr Fernández denied bilateral relations had cooled because of the natural gas crisis and insisted that. ..they've never been better.

However Mr Fernandez was unable to give a date or timetable for the ending of the crisis but underlined that the situation will stabilize in 2005 and by 2006: "Argentina will have ample energy resources for export."

As to Santiago's annoyance when Argentina recently signed a contract to purchase Bolivian natural gas under the condition, "...not one molecule of Bolivian gas is going to Chile," Mr Fernandez said President Kirchner's administration acted seriously with great respect for both countries, ' ...and we feel the contract is not damaging to our close relation with Chile.

Mercosur representatives are meeting in Santiago to address migratory problems in the region, particularly immigrants' human rights and their contribution to cultural, social and economic development of recipient countries.

Forfeiture of Maya V

OWNERS of the Uruguayan-flagged deep ocean fishing boat Maya V have not sued against the capture of their ship by Australian authorities, forfeiting the boat to the fisheries management authority without contest.

The forfeiture occurred automatically at the beginning of this month when the boat's owners had failed to make application in the Federal Court against the applica-

Worth an estimated \$AUD5 million, the Maya V is a state-of-theart deep sea fishing vessel now destined to be scuttled

The vessel was apprehended after it was alleged to be fishing in the Australian Fishing Zone on January 21 this year.

When brought to Fremantle with its officers under arrest, 35 crew were also charged with illegal fishing offences

32 of the 35 have since pleaded guilty and gone home but three remain in Western Australia and may fight the charges.

The boat's owners, Alcimar SA -Uruguayan company - may have bought the vessel at sea, and it has been alleged that it was owned by Navalmar at the time of its apprehension.

Gibraltar government will not attend pre-C24 meeting

THE GIBRALTAR government confirmed it is not attending the United Nations C24 Decolonisation Committee's Pacific regions conference being held in Papua New Guinea.

A government spokesman said, we feel that the two annual appearances by the Chief Minister before both the C24 and the Fourth Committee are sufficient." He also pointed out that Gibraltar had not been able to change motions at these seminars.

The seminar is conducted within

the framework of the Second International Decade for the Eradication of Colonialism (2001-2010) and focuses on practical steps to advance the decolonization process in the Non-Self-Governing Territories of the Pacific region.

Among the issues discussed during the seminar are the role of the Special Committee in facilitating decolonisation of the Non-Self-Governing Territories and the views of the representatives of Non-Self-Governing Territories, both in the Pacific region and the Caribbean, on their present status and prospects for decolonisation

The participants will include the delegation of the Special Committee and other United Nations Member States, representatives of the administering Powers, elected representatives of the Non-Self-Governing Territories, a number of experts in decolonisation in the Pacific region and some non-governmental organisations based in the Non-Self Governing Territories

'Significant' deficit in budget

THE budget deficit in this financial year is "significant" however losses should be replaced in two to three years.

Speaking after the official confirmation of the budget measures for the 2004/2005 financial year. Chairman of Standing Finance Committee Councillor Mike Summers confirmed the government is facing a deficit which will be funded by the government's reserves.

He added that the government will also face a deficit of £3 million next year, "...but after that we should at least be back to balanced budgets and some kind of surplus and we will aim to replace the losses we have made over those couple of years."

Councillor Summers said the projected deficit of £3 million, "...has some major assumptions in it. On the income side, illex income is expected to be significantly less than in past years; we know for example that up to £2 million of refunds still have to be made, but there is also potential to exceed target income if licence sales go well.

"On the expenditure side, in setting the budget virtually every department in the government has had its budget reduced. Some of those reductions are specific, others are targets not yet specifically identified that may be difficult to achieve in one year.

"The size of the deficit will therefore depend on final outcomes in these areas."

In spite of the cuts. Councillor

- Higher Education students grant reduced by £1.000
- Electricity price increased by 0.5p

Summers said the security of the Falklands' future is in no doubt: "We just have to manage the economy sensibly and to deal with demands on expenditure in a sensible and sensitive manner."

Chief Executive Chris Simpkins said the government is keen to ensure investment in the future. "We have got to look to build up other lines of income and indeed boost the existing lines of income and there is every reason for optimism."

every reason for optimism..."
He added, "We shouldn't forget this is the only Overseas Territory that is financially self-sufficient. We are actually in an extremely good position and there is no reason whatsoever to suspect that that is going to change."

Mr Simpkins said the government needs to avoid a "boom bust approach". He explained, "That's why you are seeing the sensible use of the Consolidated Fund to smooth out those troughs, and to return funds to the Consolidated Fund to smooth out the peaks.

"That's exactly what it's there for, it's why it was built up as a nest egg over the years and we are just making a sensible use of it."

Addressing criticism that the government is taxing the cruise industry when it should be trying to attract more visitors. Councillor Summers said the income raised from an increased charge for passengers will be used to pay for added security.

He said, "This is not a charge that the government is going to use to be any better off. It is a charge to stop us being even worse off. There are now significant costs for providing security services for cruise vessels, as indeed there are for airlines.

"We are just trying to cover a real cost and I don't think the cruise vessel industry themselves will be deterred, nor will they be surprised.

"The security issue is one that they are very acutely aware of they won't come here if we don't provide proper security services - it's something that they demand - so, inevitably, it should be their passengers who pay for it."

Included in the revenue measures approved by councillors is a service charge which will amalgamate the existing water charge and a new refuse collection charge for domestic premises in Stanley.

Financial Secretary Derek Howatt said the £250 charge each year. "...won't totally recover the cost of the refuse collection service - it will be about £15 short of the full cost."

Boarding fees for children living at Stanley House Hostel have been increased by 50%. Councillor Summers described the existing fee of £1 per day as, "pretty cheap".

per day as, "pretty cheap".

He said, "The suggestion was that it should be increased to £2 a day, which is still pretty cheap, but we thought that was a bit much, doubling it. One pound fifty a day as a boarding charge for a child really isn't very much money."

When asked if this increase is affecting those in the community who can least afford it, Councillor Summers responded, "We hope not and we think not. I doubt there are many parents who can't afford £150 a day.

"As the Financial Secretary has said on a number of occasions...if anybody is in genuine hardship there are ways of dealing with it. So if anybody genuinely can't afford to pay and can demonstrate that, then the government will pick up that cost."

WELL, thank goodness it's all over. The budget has finally been revealed and, overall, it doesn't seem too bad.

While it galls me a bit to have to pay an extra ten pounds a year in vehicle tax for the privilege of having my car exhaust destroyed by Stanley's dodgy roads, I guess it could have been much worse. We've even managed to keep 50% of the nation's most extraordinary luxury, the holiday credit

I was worried by a few items after hearing the proposed measures on Tuesday - including a 100% increase in boarding fees at Stanley House and the introduction of user pay health charges - but in actuality, councillors had a rethink and increased the hostel fees by 50% (that's 50p per day) and dropped the medical charges all together.

Like most people who listened to the budget broadcasts, I was initially miffed at the rubbish disposal charge - after all, when you've had

something free for so long, it hurts to have to start paying.

I was a little concerned that this might lead to people opting out of having their bins emptied by the professionals and, in an effort to avoid the government charge, disposing of their rubbish themselves. If this were to happen, it's inevitable some lazy sod would take to dumping his trash on the common, at the beach or over a neighbour's fence. However Councillor Summers assured me yesterday that this is not an option - you can't empty your own wheelie bin and avoid the charge.

Now, before you radicals out there start planning to march upon the Secretariat with wheelie bins at the fore, protesting at this outrageous

move, just think for a minute.

Although we've never been charged before, this service costs a lot to provide - if the country has the merest hint of being in financial danger why should we continue to get it for free? £250 a year for clean water and empty bins isn't the end of the world, is it? (And it could be much worse - I was shocked to learn on the BBC Breakfast News this week that inhabitants of some small towns in Britain have to fork out over £200 per month in council tax.)

If nothing else, this tighter budgeting exercise should get government departments into the habit of being frugal. We've had it so good for the past decade, I believe we have become careless, and in some cases care-

free, with money.

Even if the illex fishery picks up again, we should remember the lessons learned this year. There's no reason why we shouldn't budget with the same vigour in future.

Islands are ready for co-operation

"FALKLAND ISLANDERS are ready to engage in constructive, pragmatic and practical cooperation with Argentina," the Governor believes, however, "...sovereignty is not on the agenda."

In his annual Address to the Nation at the opening of Legislative Council on Tuesday morning. His Excellency the Governor said the deterioration in the relationship with Argentina and failure of the illex squid fishery have, "...coincided to make this year, and possibly several years to come, especially challenging for the Islands, and most of all for your elected representatives."

The Kirchner government, Mr Pearce said, "...appears to have concluded that putting pressure on Falk-land Islanders will contribute to their objective of bringing the Islands to the negotiating table to discuss sov-

ereignty.

"Hence their decision to refuse authorisations for charter flights bringing cruise ship passengers to the Falklands, and the incursion by the Argentine naval vessel Almirante Irizar into the Falklands fishing zone.

Mr Pearce said his message to the Argentine government is very clear: "Such tactics are entirely counterproductive. Falkland Islanders are determined to maintain their right to self-determination. The commitment of the British Government to uphold that right is unshakeable.

That commitment is demonstrated by the presence here of sig-nificant British Forces, recently redesignated British Forces South Atlantic Islands, for which Islanders continue to be extremely grateful."

He said sovereignty, "...is not and will not be on the agenda," but Islanders are ready to engage in, "...constructive, pragmatic and practical cooperation with Argentina.

Mr Pearce said both parties stand to benefit from such a relationship. However he added that recent events have not made that any easier. "Progress requires a stable, predictable and reliable Argentine partner equally committed to mutually beneficial cooperation.'

Also in his speech, given before the announcement of 2004/5 budget proposals, Mr Pearce warned the nation that the failure of the illex would force the government to make some tough decisions. He said, "The almost total failure of the illex squid to appear in Falklands waters this year has made this the worst year in the history of the illex fishery. It is impossible to say yet whether this is the beginning of a trend or whether the fishery is just going through a difficult period in the cycle. The scientific advice is that the cause is the oceanographic and climatic factors, which have prevailed this year to make conditions for the fishery unusually adverse.

The very substantial reduction in the Government's income which this will cause means that this budget session of Legislative Council will have to take some tough decisions about Government spending over the

next few years.

He warned against panic, reminding listeners that the government has built up a "substantial reserve" over a period of years, "...which makes it possible to address the budgetary shortfall in a measured way "
However he added, "...it is going

to be a difficult budget session. It is understandable that almost everybody in the community will have particular interests which they will want to protect, and will be putting pressure on councillors not to cut this or that government activity. There is nothing wrong with that in our democratic society.

Mr Pearce encouraged the public to be "understanding" of the task faced by elected members this year. "Nobody likes having to cut spending. It is never popular. The electorate rapidly takes for granted the provision of new or improved services, and complains when they are put under threat.

"But there are areas where public provision has been especially generous here in the Falklands and where current spending is unsustainable. It is certainly true that in a number of areas local provision has been substantially more generous than the UK

equivalent.

"Councillors have a duty to face up to these realities, to prioritise, and to take unpopular decisions when, as now, circumstances make it necessary.'

Mussel fact finding trip | Stanley gets breathless

Falklands fishing industry have just completed a two week fact finding trip.

Julian Morris, John Barton, Simon Hardcastle, Stuart Wallace, Dick Sawle and Hamish Wylie covered over 2,000 miles by vehicle in order to meet with key players in farming, production systems, processing and marketing.

The need for this particular trip was identified by a group of local fishing companies following their production of a business plan for growing mussels in the Islands. Harnish Wylie who coordinated the visit said, "We knew from Simon's experience that mussels could be farmed, but our business plan was based upon a lot of assumptions and we knew very little about the industry we wanted to participate in, or the markets they sold into.

Mr Wylie said that the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) was, ..unfamiliar with the industry and the regulatory environment that would enable development.

He added, "We have all learned

sel industry in the past two weeks.

Following this visit we can now complete the work necessary to determine if the risk of investing in the creation of a mussel industry is acceptable. We will ultimately have to take a view on where the mussel industry is going over the next five to ten years, and success will weigh heavily on getting this right."

Mr Wylie said his expectation is

that by the end of this year, "... we will be in a position to decide whether to go for it or not.

Members of the group have also attended meetings with the Bank of Scotland and The Royal Bank of Scotland regarding corporate finance for the fishing industry.

With the reduction in the Scottish fleet size both banks have potential opportunity in their fishing portfolios and, says Mr Wylie, "...the new (Falklands) fishing policy provides a raft of opportunities to the industry that will require finance not available from local sources.3

Aquaculture 2004 was run concurrently this year with Fishing 2004.

Price of meat may increase

THE 'first cost' of meat may increase at the end of the week.

Addressing rumours that the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) is proposing to increase its charges by 30-60 per cent, company Chairman Tony Blake commented, "I suspect there will be an increase of some sort - but nothing has been decided yet - we are meeting on Friday to discuss it.

Mr Blake said a FIMCo directors' meeting is to be held to discuss the prices charged for a new system of processing animals

through the abattoir.

However he added that, if necessary, FIMCo directors will consult farming organisations again before setting prices. He said, "As directors, we are responsible to the company but one of our main priorities is to make sure farmers get a fair return for their products.

Mr Blake stressed that FIMCo is a commercial company. the directors can't make it run at a loss, so our main aim is to get it on the right side of the line.

There was a large loss before and we have made great inroads in that with the latest sheep season, but the main problem we face at the moment is trying to maintain a level of production during the winter months that will allow us to remain profitable. Due to the sheer size of the enterprise, this is always going to be difficult.

Mr Blake said a price for beef has never actually been set by FIMCo however the directors hope to rectify this on Friday, adding, "There is no basis to say we have increased our prices by any percentage as we have never actually had a price for beef."

Drink driver fined after collision

A YOUNG Stanley man who pleaded guilty to drink driving was fined £350 last week.

John Hirtle gave a reading of 69 microgrammes per 100 millilitres of breath after crashing into a parked car on Ross Road West on May 17.

The court heard Mr Hirtle had been drinking and playing darts in Deanos Bar and had called for a taxi several times but when none came he decided to drive himself. Mr Hirtle caused considerable damage to both cars and suffered injuries to his own forehead, which were treated by a doctor. There was also slight damage to a fence which he reversed into after the accident.

As well as being fined, his licence was endorsed and he was disqualified from driving for 12 months and ordered to pay £50 prosecution costs.

Fighting with son 'extremely unpleasant'

A MAN who fought with his son has been heavily fined.

Gabriel Ceballos was fined a total of £550 plus £70 costs on Friday, May 21 after pleading guilty to offences of affray and common assault

The court heard that he had got into an argument with his son, Alistair Ceballos Anderson at the Trough on May 16.

The pair went outside and wit-

nesses then found the defendant standing over his son, who he had punched to the ground and bitten.

Alistair went home with friends, but his father turned up later and stood outside the house shouting. When his son went out to speak to him, Mr Ceballos began lashing out, landing punches on his son.

Who would argue with Dowling?

I REFER to the article regarding the sale of the Upland Goose Hotel in last week's issue of the Penguin News.

I find it strange that MercoPress can write about the Upland Goose Hotel's 1982 wartime experience without first referring to me or one of my family.

It would be interesting to know if any person who was here on April 2, 1982 would have argued with Major Dowling and Captain Gafoglio, the Argentine 'gestapo.'

They appeared at the Upland Goose Hotel before the tanks rolled into town and requisitioned rooms for themselves and other high ranking Argentine officers. There was absolutely no question of any discussion on the matter. They wanted the rooms and they took them.

As quickly as they appeared, they disappeared and were replaced by nine Roman Catholic priests whose role was apparently to help the Argentine soldiers on a spiritual level. They seldom left the building.

We strongly objected to the presence of any Argentines at the Upland Goose Hotel during the occupation, but the choice was to put up with it or leave. We chose to stay to ensure that our livelihood was still standing at the end of the war - which we had no doubt would

When the curfew was introduced, 20 to 25 Falkland Islanders joined my family as the hotel was identified as a safe building, having walls 20 inches thick. This did not stop bullets coming in through the roof, which happened on several occasions

We celebrated the arrival of British Troops on June 14, just as everyone else in town did. Max Hastings led the press corps arrival and benefited from drinks on the hotel. as did every other British person who walked through the doors on June 14, 1982

The hotel is one of the oldest buildings in Stanley built in the 1850's by Jacob Napoleon Goss. It was first known as The Eagle Inn, later the Ship Hotel and then the Upland Goose Hotel since 1969.

I would very much like to see the Upland Goose Hotel become the premier hotel in Stanley once again, and I wish the new owner/ leasee every success.

Wearing seatbelts would have benefits

IN MR Miller's recent letter concerning the wearing of seatbelts (*Penguin News*, May 14), he correctly states that military personnel are required to wear seatbelts at all times.

As an employer, BFSAI have a duty of care to enforce this regulation. However, Mr Miller's inference that this regulation had contributed to military fatalities in road traffic accidents in the Falkland Islands is completely unjustified.

I wish to assure Mr Miller and those who would oppose the wearing of seatbelts, that the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents' statistics strongly indicate that thousands of lives have been saved since the UK Law was changed in 1986 and many thousands more have escaped serious injury.

Clearly, due to the low volume of traffic in the Falkland Islands and the different road surfaces, comparisons with the UK are difficult to make but I have no doubt that the wearing of seatbelts would have benefits here too.

The number of road traffic accidents involving military drivers serving in the Falkland Islands is higher than we would like, but there have been no military fatalities in recent years.

Since December 2003, five of those accidents have involved Land Rovers rolling over in the road-side ditches. One driver sustained slight injuries but all other drivers and passengers were completely uninjured and none were trapped in the vehicles by their seat belts. However, if seat belts had not been worn, I would strongly suspect that a fatality or serious injury would have occurred.

Stanley water problems Bare faced cheek

A WATER shortage in one area of Stanley and too much water in another were the main topics under discussion at a Public Works Committee meeting this week.

The shortage of water experienced by Stanley several years ago following two dry summers prompted the Public Works Department to produce a feasibility study on a possible alternate water supply for Stanley.

The meeting heard that several factors contribute towards the Moody Brook supply not being capable of sustaining a reliable quantity of water for the town. Stone runs in that area cause much of the water to disperse rather than enter the catchment area.

Shortages of water have worried the government for some time. Several years ago water restrictions were considered following two dry years and the many new houses being built in Stanley may also stretch the present source to its limits.

It was recommended that work continues on the design stage, for which funding is available, and a recommendation be put forward that the project be included in the capital budget when a decision has been made. Director of Public Works Manfred Keenleyside estimated that work on the project would take, "...nine months from scratch," however other suggestions were that the work could be carried out over two financial years, being completed over two seasons.

Surface water on Jeremy Moore Avenue is plentiful and PWD have received several complaints of water going through gardens. Some people have had their gardens washed out twice in a year.

Mr Keenleyside produced a plan of the area pointing out the main drains saying that the prob-lem is that the, "...pipes are too small to cope.

Chairman of the meeting Councillor Roger Edwards suggested PWD, "...check out the cost and come up with a way to increase the pipe size.

It was confirmed that a mobile stone crusher had been ordered and should arrive in the Falklands in October of this year in time to prepare materials to cap the Mount Pleasant Road during the forth com-

The painting of a yellow line on part of Jersey road has been approved in principal but has to go back to the Chief Police Officer so he can send the recommendation to Executive Council.

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A taste of life on HMS Leeds Castle

HAVE you ever wondered what life is like on a naval patrol vessel in the Falklands?

In a new series for Penguin News, Lieutenant Richard Abbot, Gunnery Officer on HMS Leeds Castle gives us an insight to life on board.

Monday May 10, 2004 - 7am.

The Ship's Company of HMS Leeds Castle is woken by the familiar sound of "Call the Hands".

It is a typical Falkland Islands day, the wind is from the west at 25-30 knots, the visibility is good but moderate in the occasional squalls and the sea state was forecast to be rough.

The ship set sail for Pebble Island as normal with six members of the Roulement Infantry Company (RIC) embarked. As we travelled out of Choiseul Sound into Choiseul North it became obvious that the weather forecasters had got it right.

The wind was from the west at 30 knots, the visibility was good outside of showers and the sea state was rough. However, with our stabilisers now in full working order, the ship took it all in her stride, cutting through the waves like a knife through butter.

The weather was forecast to get worse and sure enough through the



course of the night the wind and the sea state both steadily increased. By morning the wind was a steady 50 knots gusting to 65 in squalls making it impossible for us to anchor within the tight bounds of Pebble Island. Instead the ship headed to the more sheltered confines of San Carlos Bay.

Despite the protection that was provided by the surrounding hills it was still too windy for the ship to come to the buoy in San Carlos Bay. Instead the decision was made for the ship to anchor to the west of the buoy and sit the storm out.

Tuesday May 11

By morning San Carlos Bay was no longer the beast of the night before but gentle, tamed by the surrounding hills. The wind was moderate from the southwest, which allowed the RIC to go ashore along with a patrol from the ship.

An exhilarating sea boat ride later we landed in Ajax Bay the site of disused meat processing plant and the position of an old field hospital during the Falklands War. After we had changed out of our dry suits and into our walking boots we headed for the top of Campito Hill, the site of the Ardent and Antelope memorials.

Twenty-two years of being exposed to the harsh Falklands weather has meant that the cross on the memorial is currently not in place. A new cross will be put on the site in the near future with a ceremony to rededicate the memorial. Seeing the memorial in conjunction with the beauty of San Carlos Bay below really demonstrates the contrasts of the Falkland Islands. Such a pretty yet inhospitable place hides many secrets below the waves of its coastline. It was a poignant moment and one that I won't forget quickly.

After enjoying a relaxing cup of tea with the RIC on top of Campito we started the tricky decent to the only settlement on the south side of San Carlos Bay, Wreck Point House.

On arrival we bumped into the residents Gerald and Doreen Dickson who promptly invited us in. We were treated to some traditional Falkland Islands hospitality and to plenty of good humour and welcome conversation. After we could no longer eat any more short bread or drink another cup of tea it was time to proceed back to the

With military timing the sea boats returned to whisk us back onboard in preparation to embark several key personnel via a British International Helicopter Transfer. On completion of the transfer we immediately sailed on task to Fox Bay our next settlement visit.

As always with Leeds Castle, you can count on the unexpected. Not more than three miles from our anchorage position as we exited the confines of San Carlos Bay we were once again struck by near gale

This did not affect our sailing but if the winds did not abate we would find it almost impossible to anchor in Fox Bay, especially given that the winds were from the south west meaning that Fox Bay would not provide us with any shelter from the growing swell which was being generated somewhere off the coast of Southern Chile.

As we got closer to our destination it became quite obvious that anchoring in this wind and sea state would only be too risky for peacetime operations. This meant an uncomfortable night at sea trying to keep the ship from rolling too heavily to allow the crew to gain as good a night sleep as possible. Wednesday May 12

The morning brought some respite with the winds moderating from 40 knots to be around 15 to 20 knots still from the southwest. However the strong winds of the previous two days had left their mark, a long moderate swell which battered the coastline of Fox Bay. The decision was made that we would still anchor in our intended position in Fox Bay and make a judgement on whether it was practical to go ashore in the sea boats once in position.

The approach to Fox Bay was easy enough and the anchor was dropped with pinpoint accuracy on the 25-metre contour. As soon as the ship stopped in the water the ship began to roll slowly from side

to side.

The ship came to rest in a beam sea with the swell breaking on our port side. It was a real test of how well we had secured the ship for sea with the ship reaching up to 30° of heel at one point. This may sound a lot to most people but a warship is built to be able to cope with extremes of heel. However as you can imagine 30° will often feel like a lot more and is certainly not practical to operate sea boats in, what can be a dangerous evolution in the most benign of circumstances. We therefore weighed anchor and set sail for Choiseul North to conduct helicopter operations with the RAF the next day. We all hoped that the next day might bring calmer conditions.

Thursday May 13

A new day, a new dawn. After a night sat off Mare Harbour, in sight of MPA, the memories of the terrible weather we had experienced the previous few days were now a distant memory. The sun was shining and weather was fine. Everything seemed to be coming together on the day we were due to

return to harbour.

The planned flying serial with the RAF search and rescue Sea King helicopter went ahead without any problems, with the ship conducting numerous deck-landings over a period of three hours. The whole exercise was a success with both parties gaining valuable training. On completion the ship returned to East Cove Military Port for a well deserved period of rest and maintenance.
















Blue Beach landings remembered

THE Falklands civilian and military communities have gathered together for a joint Act of Remembrance at Blue Beach Cemetery, San Carlos.

The Landing Day commemoration, held on May 21, is always a well-attended event and this year was no exception with people travelling from Stanley and farm settlements on both East and West Falkland to pay their respects.

The service is held to mark the events leading up to and including the initial landings at Blue Beach and the battle for Goose Green in 1982. It remembers the courage, professionalism and self sacrifice of Lieutenant Nicholas Taylor who was killed while flying near Goose Green on May 4, 1982, Captain John Hamilton MC, of 22 Special Air Service who was killed at Port Howard on June 10, 1982, and all members of the Task Force who landed at San Carlos on May 21, 1982 and subsequently fell, including those from 3 Commando Brigade Air Squadron

The dead of HMS Ardent, HMS Antelope, HMS Argonaut, HMS Coventry, HMS Sheffield, HMS Fearless, and Atlantic Conveyor are remembered and those that fell in the subsequent operations that led to the battle of Goose Green - members of 2nd Battalion Parachute Regiment, 205 Signals Squadron, and 656 Squadron Army Air Corps.

The service conducted by Forces Chaplain, Padre Paul Mellor, assisted by Reverend Paul Sweeting, Monsignor Michael

McPartland and Pastor Ken Newton followed a traditional format of readings, hymns and prayer

The weather was kind to the large gathering at the cemetery which lies in a somewhat exposed part of the Islands. The flat calm conditions with surrounding hill fog created an introspective almosphere, appropriate for a time when thoughts are with those who fell during the war and their families.

Following the service, refreshments in the form of mulled wine, tea coffee and steak sandwiches were provided by Catering and

SCHOOL HOLIDAY PATTERN Have your say

Over the past two years, and more particularly in recent weeks, there has been increasing pressure for a review

of the School pattern holiday.

• Recently the Headteachers have discussed this with their staff and with the Director of Education, following a decision at Education Board that a review should take place. Discussions have also taken place with the Committee of Managers of IJS, FICS and Camp Education/Hostel. All Managers have sought, or are seeking, parents' views on possible changes.

It is now time for this consultation process to be extended to the public so, if you are the parent of a child not yet old enough to attend school; are thinking of becoming a parent in the future; are a grand-parent or just an Islander who

holds a view, the Director of Education would like to hear from you.

So far initial responses seem to suggest that there is a lot of interest in moving the start of the Christmas holiday

further towards Christmas.

• It is necessary to know that there are constraints within the Schools which we <u>have</u> to work round; they are decided by Standard Attainment Tests (SATs); GCSE exams; GCSE assignment deadlines and the number of teaching periods required to complete the GCSE syllabus in FICS. This means that certain dates <u>cannot</u> be holidays.

• I am assuming that Camp Sports week will remain, although it might be necessary to try to negotiate a slight adjustment to the dates, depending on the time available between the return to school after Christmas, and the start of the Sports. We would not want any very short periods in School. If the Christmas holiday was longer, the August holiday could only be 2 weeks.

• It is sensible to have halves of terms which are approximately the same length; very long halves are very tiring for teachers and pupils (a few years ago, the term leading up to Christmas was 91 days without a break!!); very short halves mean disruptions to carefully planned schemes of work and do not provide good sized teaching blocks.

Once the Christmas break was 8 weeks long (but see the note above); some people believe it has been cut recently from 6 weeks to 5. This is not correct – no recent changes have been made, but it was reduced in 1999. There is obviously strong feeling about this <u>but</u> remember the constraints. Pupils have to be in school at certain key times. They are as follows:

IJS SATs exams – around 2nd week in May FICS GCSE exams – approx May 10th – June 18th but may vary slightly each year.

FICS requires a minimum of 12 teaching weeks from the date on which students return after the Christmas break to the date on which students go on study leave.

Camp Education - no fixed points.

• Other factors to be taken into account are the Public Holidays; if the holiday dates were changed it is likely that <u>all</u> school pupils would be in Stanley on Liberation Day or Battle Day. Is this a problem? It does have <u>advantages</u> e.g. youngsters belonging to Scouts or Sea Cadets or Girl Guides could take part in the parades and join in the celebrations. The disadvantage is that they would not be in Camp for such celebrations.

Nutrition, advertising and dental health

THERE is more to dental education these days than encouraging better brushing.

Brushing will help prevent decay but a good proportion of decay is found where the tooth brush cannot reach-between the teeth and under old fillings.

Furthermore tooth erosion (caused by too much exposure to acids or fizz from fizzy drinks, and citrus juices) is being found more and more in young people. Clearly we cannot just go on advocating brushing when foods, meals, snacks and fluids are of prime importance to our dental health as well as our health in general.

Regular viewers of UK television will most probably have heard the recent news reports on the deteriorating health of children today. The diets of children contain far more than the recommended levels of fat, sugar and salt and too little fibre.

Children's consumption of fruit and vegetables is low and their intakes of some vitamins and minerals is poor. Children's consumption of confectionery and snack foods is high. Biscuits, crisps, confectionery and cakes have been found to account for a third of children's energy intakes as snacking or grazing has increasingly replaced formal meal times.

When such changes in dietary patterns have been accompanied by reduced levels of physical activity there is little wonder that obesity is on the increase.

Dental decay which was generally on the decline since introduction of fluoride in tooth past in the 1970's is on the increase! Of particular concern is surprisingly high levels (over half of the young people sampled) of tooth erosion in the upper incisor or first molar teeth attributable to fizzy drinks.

One fifth of children report eating fruit and vegetables only once a day despite efforts to promote the benefits of having five portions per day. Sweet foods and soft drinks are making up the larger part of a child's diet.

Children's eating patterns and food preferences are influenced by a number of complex and interacting factors that include taste preferences and parental and peer group pressures and advertising.

Hundreds of millions of pounds go into promoting processed foods, confectionery and soft drinks. By comparison, the advertising that goes into promoting fruit and vegetables is a pittance.

Will the food industry regulate itself or will it only change if sufficient pressure for better nutrition comes from outside?

It is now recognised that tooth decay, obesity, diabetes, vascular and heart disease, cerebral vascular disease, cancer, reduced life span and other conditions can be linked to poor nutrition in the modern life style. Pressure groups and health professionals are beginning to get the message across that the food industry must change to promoting healthier foods and life styles.

Getting away from an unhealthy diet is made all the more difficult when children get hooked on the taste of items containing high levels of sugar, fats and salt. Sensible eating habits should start at an early age.

For babies whose teeth are starting to come through, it is important that levels of sugar are kept very low. Commercial baby juices in particular have a high sugar content and there is still no commercial baby drink that is entirely safe for the teeth.

Most health visitors say a thirsty baby will drink water, but parents introduce juice because they think water and milk are boring. Reverting to plain water becomes a problem once the taste for juice is acquired.

The only safe drinks for babies are water and milk. Good advice for managing fluid intake and feeding for babies is available from health visitors, doctors and the dental team.

If all else fails for the growing child with rampant tooth decay, the dentist may offer a 'diet sheet'-A blank paper for a parent to record everything eaten and drunk over a four day period (including one day from the weekend). This can show up the likes of a child having fizzy drinks more than two times a day...sometimes late at night or just before bedtime.

The dentist will offer advice or suggest healthy options based on going through the diet sheet with the parent.

There is a rule of five: make sure that young children do not eat or drink more than five times per day (i.e. have three square meals and two snacks). Even small differences in selection of foods or timing can prevent tooth decay and be better nutritionally.

The other rule of five is to have five portions of fresh fruit or vegetables per day. By opting for fresh fruit and vegetables, it follows that a smaller proportion of total nutrition will come from sweets or high

How can a family on a tight budget afford fresh fruit and vegetables and other healthy op-

Suggestions for economical ways of preparing fruits and vegetables and other healthy foods and organizing healthy meals are available in brochures or advice from the health visitor or dental team.

Deciding on the best choices is difficult. It is well known the cheapest varieties of tinned or prepared foods available in supermarkets may have the highest levels of sugar, fats and salts.

Before opting for the cheapest item, it could be worthwhile reading the labelling. Since the ingredients are listed in order of concentration, sugar is often near the top....(check out baked beans, tinned soup and tomato ketchup).

Other purchases to be aware of include fruit drinks and squashes which contain sugar and flavouring. These are invariably much cheaper than pure fruit juices but contain little nutrient value. Tinned fruit in syrup is usually much cheaper than tinned fruit in natural juice without added sugar.

Along with nutritionists, health visitors, and medical professionals, dentists and other members of the dental team are more involved in offering advice and suggestions for healthy eating and life style than ever before. Essentially we are all giving out the same advice to eat a varied, well balanced diet complete with fresh fruit and vegetables with reduced levels of sugar, fat and salt.

GENERAL OVERVIEW

Australian wool markets surged in price on the first two days of selling last week, but steadied on the final day. Overall prices finished the week up considerably. As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide"

Price rises of between 5 and 12 pence per kilogram clean were recorded across the entire micron

spectrum.

Skirtings, Locks and Crutchings also finished the week higher in value as a result of the week's activity. Strong buying competition was particularly evident for long, sound. low vegetable matter skirt-

Currency changes and falling auction volumes were stated as being major factors involved in the gains. Buying activity was quite widespread with most of the world's key topmakers all very active in the market.

Australian Market

The Australian offering for the week totaled 64,770 bales. 58,947 bales were sold during the weeks trading (8.9% passed-in). Included in the offering were 4,061 bales of crossbred wool of which 3,588 bales were sold. (11.0% passed-in) Note:





Active volcano in Antartic waters

A TEAM of US and Canadian scientists have discovered an active and previously unknown submarine volcano in the extreme north of the Antarctic Peninsula, very close to the Argentine Army base of Good

The volcano the largest so far in the Antarctic submarine shelf, an area where volcanoes are not common, was detected by chance by the research vessel Lawrence M. Gould belonging to the US National Foundation for Science on its return trip from the Larsen B ice barrier.

Eugene Domack chief scientist of the expedition and a researcher at Hamilton College in New York said the volcano stands 700 metres above the seafloor and reaches to within 275 metres of the ocean surface with a possible mass of 1.5 million cubic metres of volcanic rock. It lies in the Antarctic Sound, at the northernmost tip of Antarctica, and is north of the existing boundary of known volcanic activity in the region.

The US-Canadian team mapped and sampled the ocean floor and collected video and data indicative of the existence of a major volcano.

The discovery is an unexpected by product of research to find out why the Larsen B ice shelf broke up several years ago.

Sergio Marenssi, Director of the

Argentine Antarctic Institute indicated the volcano is actually very close to the coast, in a channel separating the extreme north of the Peninsula from Joinville Island, ' very common route for Antarctic vessels.

Scientists also detected that next to the summit ring of the underwater volcano there's an increase in water temperature and recalled historical reports indicating that water colour changes were common, which means recent activity.

Furthermore submarine life along the sea shelf and slopes of the volcano is interrupted close to the crown of the volcano by dark rocks, an in-

dication of the presence of lava.

Mr Marenssi, a PhD in Geology. said. " ...the southwest coast of the channel has a wall of volcanic rocks dating back 4 to 5 million years, however it was unknown if volcanic activity was recent or if it could still be active.

The first sonar indications of the possible existence of a volcano in the area date from January 2002 when extensive concentric and symmetric formations without glacier tracks were detected.

According to Mr Marenssi the new volcano is not linked to other volcanic phenomena in the area particularly King George island: "They are of different origin.

Fuel smuggling from Argentina

MAGALLANES energy distributors are warning local authorities of an incipient but growing cornt rab and of fuel from neighbouring Argentine Patagonia where gasoline costs half the price.

Gasoline in Punta Arenas and Puerto Natales costs 583 Chilcan pesos a litre but a few miles a cross the border in Argentina the same fuel sells for the equivalent of 280 Chilean pesos

Local distributors warm that not only will the industry suffer but also government revenue since the price of gasoline sold in Chile includes 42% tax (VAT and a specific fuel levy).

Fuel prices in Argentima have remained unchanged since December

2002 plus the fact that the Patagonian provinces of Chubut, Santa Cruz and Tierra del Fuego benefit from a special rebate that dates back from when President Nestor Kirchner was governor of Santa Cruz.

Cheaper fuel is one of the many incentives to attract people to live in Patagonia.

Magallanes fuel distributors point out that ironically the fuel sold in some of the Argentine neighbouring populations such as Rio Turbio. where Puerto Natales residents are going to fill their gasoline tanks, is supplied from Cabo Negro, close to Punta Arenas and a dependency from Chile's government oil company, ENAP

160,000 Chilean's reside in Argentina

MORE THAN 200,000 Chileans actually reside in Central and South America according to the latest poll of registered Chileans over seas taken by the Foreign Affairs Ministry in collaboration with the National Statistics Office.

Of the 201,021 voluntary statements, 80.2% (160,000) live in Argentina; 6.2% in Venezuela; 3.6% in Brazil: 2.5% in Ecuador and 1.7% in Peru In Central America num bers are insignificant.

Of the total polled, 4 1.2% left Chile for economic reasons; 3 1 .8% personal reasons and 8.9% alleged political reasons. However 36.2% are planning to return to Chile in the near future of which 14% in the next three years and 21.3% in the next ten years.

According to the Chilean Statistics Office it is estimated that 628,188 Chileans reside overseas. This number only includes those actually born in Chile meaning the final figure could considerably increase if children born overseas are also

Survey plane damaged after landing gear failure

THE Fugro aeromagnetic survey aircraft, in the Islands carrying out work on behalf of Falkland Minerals Limited, suffered an uncomfortable landing while returning from a flight at the weekend

The aircraft was landing at Stanley airport at approximately 3.20pm on Saturday when a failure of the nose landing gear occurred.

The aircraft came to rest on the runway. There was no fire resulting from the incident and the two people on board escaped uninjured

A spokesperson for the Department of Civil Aviation said, "The Stanley Airport Fire and Rescue Service were on the scene immediately as were engineers from the Falkland Islands Government Air Service (FIGAS) complex.

There was no fuel leakage from the aircraft and no risk of fire. All necessary precautions were taken by the firemen to secure the aircraft and the occupants were taken for a medical check.

As a result of the incident the aircraft's propellers, engines and nose landing gear have been damaged.

The aircraft has been recovered to the FIGAS hanger and an investigation into the cause of the incident is being conducted by the Department of Civil Aviation, in conjunction with the Flight Safety Department of Fugro Airborne Surveys and the Brazilian Department of Civil Aviation.

Derek Reeves of Falkland Minerals Ltd said the company is relieved that no one was injured in the incident and, "...we are now await-

ing a full report from Fugro Airborne Surveys as to the full extent of the damage and are also considering options to undertake additional survey work at a later date.

He said the data collection phase of Falkland Mineral Ltd's aerial magnetic/radiometric survey over the Falklands that commenced in March this year, "... has collected to date a total of 32,685-line km

'The original planned survey was for 31,663-line km but an additional 1,489-line km were surveyed over specific areas that had been identified during the survey and from previous work.

The aerial magnetic and radiometric survey covered about 90% of the land area of 12,000 sq km, and included 10,300 sq km of 500m spaced flight lines and 1,500 sq km covered with 250m spaced lines and 125 sq km covered with 100m spaced lines.
"The 250m and 100m areas in-

clude the key anomalies recognised from the survey and previous work.

Mr Reeves said it is expected that the integration of all geological, assay and magnetic and radiometric data, "...including the interpretation and modelling of the magnetic data..." will be completed by late data..." will be completed by late July, "...at which time an assessment of the project will be undertaken." He added, "If suitable targets are

identified it is planned that drilling could commence late this year or

early next year."

News in brief

TWO voices familiar to Islanders are to reappear on the British Forces Broadcasting Service (BFBS) in the Falklands.

Steve Johnston and Hermina Graham, both former presenters on the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station (FIBS), arrive in the Islands tomorrow

Steve will be presenting the Morning Show, broadcast to MPA only. He will be in the Islands for one month before taking up a long term posting in Cyprus.

Hermina, who is in the Islands for a year, will present the Breakfast Show until July and will also be carrying out some television work for the forces service.

BFBS Station Manager Richard Hutchinson says both DJs are "really excited" about being back in the Islands.

Steve and Hermina are replacing presenters Sarah Corani and Nick Steele who are respectively off to Northern Ireland and Canada.

Reindeer meat on sale soon

FOR the first time, reindeer meat will soon be on sale in Stanley.

Meat retailers Freshco have announced this week that they hope to have a selection of reindeer meat for sale on trial in July.

Reindeer from South Georgia were first imported to the Falklands in 2001.

WITH all the hype about childhood obesity circulating world wide, we still need to do more in the Falklands.

I know I've harped on about the extortionate price of fresh fruit and vegetables in the past and this time retailers can breath a sigh of relief - it's the physical side of things that has really got under my skin this week.

I was peeved at the government's revenue measure of increasing the price of swimming at the Leisure Centre. It's not exactly a positive encouragement for kids to make a splash is it?

Any conspirators worth their salt could conclude it's a move by the

powers that be to make us into a nation of bloaters.

We are making it harder and harder for children to exercise safely when we should be making it easier. A good starting point would be to make our roads safer for them.

Parents in the UK are often too frightened to let their children out to play in public - not because of dangerous drivers but, in this age when children seem to be abducted with alarming regularity, because of more sinister individuals who pose an ever present danger.

We are lucky; we're not overrun with these offenders as some parts of

the UK seem to be. However, our streets aren't entirely safe. If I was a parent, I wouldn't feel happy with my child walking around

Stanley - purely because of the lack of road safety awareness.

The introduction of compulsory children restraints in vehicles (a law which comes into effect on June 15, by the way) is a positive move but

more needs to be done to protect pedestrians.

Drivers need to be re-educated. Just stand outside the Post Office for ten minutes during a weekday lunchtime and you'll see that people seem to have forgotten the purpose of the zebra crossing. Drivers rarely slow down as they draw near - in fact they often speed up as they see someone approaching the crossing!

(It's all too easy to become complacent when you're behind the wheel of a four wheel drive vehicle - but those exact vehicles would easily make

mincemeat of a child.)

The level of safety doesn't exactly inspire parents to encourage their kids to walk to school.

How can we expect children to exercise regularly when, traditionally, the most accessible exercise, ie walking, has become too dangerous?

As a friend pointed out to me the other day, it's all very well that the police catch drunk drivers out on the streets at 3am, but it's time to offer more protection to children so they can feel safe on and near the road.

It would be relatively easy to rectify the problem.

Sporadically positioning police officers near zebra crossings for a few weeks would. I believe, sharpen the minds of drivers. Follow that up with the designation of more safe crossing areas for children - and, importantly, proper enforcement of them.

These moves might make the already well-occupied police force a little more busy but I truly believe they would help improve the nation's

general well being by helping our kids keep in shape.

A civic reception will be held in the Town hall from 11.30 to 12.30 which will be hosted by His Excellency the Governor and to which all residents and the Armed Services are cordially invited to attend.

Progressive step for childcare facility

THE government has put money aside for the purchase of a property to house a childcare facility.

The Childcare Steering Group met with Councillor John Birmingham on Monday to discuss the next step forward in seeking an additional facility within Stanley

Councillor Birmingham informed the meeting that he and his colleagues have made provision for money to be set aside to purchase a

property.

Committee member Steve Dent said, "A property has been identified as appropriate and negotiations are proceeding for the purchase of this property. The group expressed their sincerest thanks to councillors for having the foresight and generosity in such a serious financial time for the Islands.'

The group then discussed with Social Work Team Leader Sarah-Jane Rich the implications of regulations within childcare facilities, both pub-

lic and private.

Mr Dent reported. "There are no proposals at present to adopt regulations on the UK-model but this is something that will be reconsidered in the future."

Also at the meeting was Crown Counsel Alison Inglis who was asked to advise on how to formalise the

group into a committee that can "manage" such a facility.

Mr Dent said Ms Inglis outlined two options: "...either run the facility as a co-operative society or as a company limited by guarantee." The group discussed the pros and cons of the two options and decided that the latter would be the way forward.

The CSG will work with Ms Inglis to draw up a constitution for the new organisation. Mr Dent said, "It is also envisaged that the new group will form the first management committee, which will oversee the opening of a new nursery facility."

A meeting is to be held later this month for anyone interested in forming part of the new management committee and working towards the opening of the new facility.

It will be held on Wednesday, June 23 at 7pm in the Geography Room of the Community School.

Argentine airline service: reports rubbished

THE GOVERNOR has dismissed the notion of an Argentine airline - which in fact does not own any aircraft servicing the Falkland Islands.

Mr Howard Pearce told the Falkland Islands News Network earlier this week, "Anyone thinking they can establish a regularly scheduled air link from Argentina to the Falklands is operating in the realm of fantasy.'

On Monday, MercoPress reported that the Argentine Government had awarded Lineas Aéreas Federales SA (Lafsa) a contract to fly to several domestic destinations among which were locations in Patagonia and "South Atlantic islands"

However there is a catch as Lafsa, which was created last year by President Nestor Kirchner's administration to absorb redundant staff from two bankrupt airlines, currently operates with Southern Winds aircraft because it has no planes of its own

When questioned, the British Embassy in Buenos Aires said that currently, "... there are no plans for other regular flights," than those currently operated by Lan Chile, and charter flights from the continent. which this last season were severely limited by Argentine authorities

British Embassy sources in Buenos Aires said, "...there's an agreement for regular commercial Lan Chile flights to the Islands, and these flights once a month land in Rio Gallegos"

Further on, the Embassy sources indicated the United Kingdom is. ...waiting for a reply from Argentina to a British proposal extensive to all charter flights between the con-tinent and the Falklands," and currently,"... there are no plans for other regular flights.

Makeover for Dumbarton Castle

ROYAL Navy patrol vessel HMS Dumbarton Castle has returned home to Portsmouth from an £8m upgrade in Scotland.

The 22 year-old ship spent nine months in Rosyth being fitted with three new diesel generators, and a rebuilt junior rates' mess. Two new cranes were also fitted allowing her to carry bigger rigid inflatable seaboats more suited to the South Atlantic environment where she serves for months at a time.

Dumbarton Castle will soon embark on sea training off the west coast of Scotland and will be officially re-dedicated at a ceremony in Portsmouth on July 16.

Commanding Officer, Lt Cdr John Garratt, said: "The ship's company have worked extremely hard, in conjunction with Babcock Engineering Services who carried out the refit, to get the ship to the required standard in a tight sched-

"She is looking good and performing well and we are very much looking forward to putting her through her paces during intensive sea training."

Marine Engineering Mechanic Jess Owen, of Hilsea, Portsmouth, said he was particularly impressed with the new accommodation and recreation areas. "It is more spacious, allowing more people to socialise and is more homely – something really important when we are away from home."

HMS Dumbarton Castle has a ship's company of 51 and has spent half her life as the Falkland Islands patrol vessel, alternating duties with her sister ship HMS Leeds Castle MP

He said, "You have to remember that this decision was taken some time ago, before we knew about the collapse of the illex fishery.

Discussing some of the buildings to be covered in the feasibility study. Councillor Birmingham said, "The Fisheries Department are working in atrocious conditions. The state of Cable Cottage is a disgrace, not through anybody's fault, it's just an old building. The Secretariat is a slum. Anybody who goes into that building and says otherwise isn't having a good look around.

"To update these buildings

would cost hundreds of thousands of pounds and it was decided that, rather than just spend hundreds of thousands of pounds trying to keep old buildings going, we should look at the feasibility of pulling departments together."

When asked if £30,000 could be better spent on maintenance of the buildings, instead of the feasibility study. Councillor Birmingham referred to the Secretariat's problems, "It's not just a question of rewiring the Secretariat. Anybody who drives along the front road, if they care to look at the roof, will see that the tin is rotting away and cracks are appearing in the walls.

"The structure itself, although we've been told it's basically sound, needs a lot of work doing to it, which would be in excess of £120,000 for that alone."

RESIDENTS at Chartres on West Falkland experienced a longer than expected visit from coastal shipping vessel *Tamar* on Wednesday.

A routine call by *Tamar* with three scatrucks of supplies would normally, "...be about an hours work," said Penni McKay.

Tex Hobman was ready, at first light to work the *Tamar* and the first sea truck arrived at the jetty at 8.30.

Around midday as the tide dropped, one of the seatrucks went aground alongside the jetty. Tex Hobman and James McGhie's efforts to refloat it were unsuccessful and it was a matter of waiting for the tide to come in again.

At 5.30pm the tide was high enough for the seatruck to take to

the sea again. It was a long day said Penni, "...but at least it was flat calm and sunny."

A spokesperson for Island Shipping said the Master of *Tamar F1* had been in touch with the office. "...but there was no mention of any seatrucks going aground, nor of any damage."

The spokesperson said there was a 3.2m tidal range at Chartres on Wednesday which caused, "...a bit of a delay as the seatrucks had to wait for the tide to rise before discharge could be completed.

"However, discharge was eventually completed and both were back onboard *Tamar* by 1830hours on Wedneday evening."

Less sun and more wind than average for the month of May

THE MEAN temperature was very close to the normal, however it was much drier than average. Sunshine was slightly below average and the mean wind slightly above the average.

The mean maximum temperature was 7.1C against the average of 6.9C. The highest recorded temperature was 13.9C on May 6. The lowest maximum of 1.8C was on May 17. The mean minimum of 1.4C was down against the average of 2.2C. The lowest minimum of -2.5C was recorded on May 29.

FALKLAND residents who were imprisoned in the settlement hall at Goose Green in 1982 have commemorated their liberation.

There was a large attendance, as there is every year, at a service held on Para Hill at Goose Green on May 29.

Afterwards most retired to the Social Club, where they were imprisoned for almost a month in 1982, to chat about old times and enjoy a warming drink known as the 'Harrier.'

A party held in the Narrows Bar in the evening was also well attended as the group gatherered to remember those fallen in the battle for Goose Green

Eric Goss addressed the assembly, as he has done for the last

twenty-one years. Mr Goss thanked John Pole-Evans for reading the scripture lesson at the service earlier that day and also Mathew McMullen for reciting Brook's Prayer, written by the late Brook Hardcastle.

He said. "It was sad to record Brook left us on July 17, 2003 as number twenty of the 115 incarcerated in the hall on May 1, 1982." However he added. "Lit is pleasing to know the youngest in the hall at that time has taken over the reading. If Matthew (McMullen) looks after himself and treads carefully through life. Brook's Prayer will be delivered for another half century at least."

Kevin Ormond read a soldier's poem and called for a toast to remember. "Absent party goers" Kevin was a Lance Corporal with 2 Para at the battle for Goose Green. On the release of the prisoners from the hall he met Islander Teena Ferguson who had been held at Goose Green.

Kevin and Teena were married soon after and still live in the Islands with their two daughters

Gerald Morrison (right) cut the Liberation day cake, cooked and decorated by Kevin Ormond, Gerald, his wife Kay, his mother Molly Morrison and Jim Harvey survived 159 bullets through the bedroom of his home at Burntside in 1982.

The first liberation cake was made in the Goose Green galley by Gladys Robson, between the battle for Goose Green and the surrender



of the Argentines in Stanley on June 14, 1982. The inscription on the cake read. 'God bless all British Forces.'

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Cut to student grants may lead to less qualified labour

WE HAVE been trying, so far without success, to ascertain whether the recently announced cuts in the grants to students will apply only to future students, or to students already taking courses, and would welcome a definitive statement about what is intended.

In the last few years, our students overseas have been asked to sign a written contract with the Education Department, which binds them to meet certain norms of attendance and effort.

This, in our view, is right and proper. However, contracts are usually between two parties and it also our opinion that if the new decreases are to be applied to students already in higher education, it will be a significant breach of the Government's reciprocal contractual duties towards them and teach a sorry lesson about government commitment to further education.

Such draconian cuts as are proposed — something between 20% and 25% - come on top of a number of years when an absence of cost of living adjustments has already lowered the real value of grants, and seems curiously at odds with recent public statements by councillors about the important part these young people have to play in the future of the Falklands.

Our son, who is currently considering returning to the Falklands to pursue a career in either fisheries or conservation at the end of his degree course, will be among those affected, if the cuts are applied to the grants of current students

At the moment, as he studies and lives in Edinburgh, which is an expensive city, he barely survives; but he will not suffer because we already top up his grant when needed and are in a position to do so further. He is fortunate that we can do this, but there may be other less-fortunate families for whom the necessity of finding an extra thousand pounds could prove to be the proverbial back-breaking straw.

The fact that we have been able to support our students so much better than UK should be a source of national pride, but if, through economic necessity, such cuts have to be applied to future students, it is to be hoped that they and their parents will be given the assurances we thought we had, namely that what they are offered now, though reduced, will at least remain on offer throughout the duration of the student's course.

Given that Falklands' parents and students do not have the same access to student loans that British students have, any extra support required will inevitably come from their own financial resources, which may be limited. This means that while we shall be spared the spectre of our graduates starting careers already saddled with debt like their UK counterparts, we may also find that we start to have less home-grown graduates, electricians, plumbers, computer wizards, or any of the other people with the skills which we currently have to import.

If we are to inspire confidence and trust in government in our young people, who truly are the future of these islands, this latest ill-considered and 'knee jerk' decision, is no way to do it.

We filled up spare seats on the aircraft which carried the Governor and other senior officials participating in the event and tried to share these out reasonably. We did try to contact Mr Clement's companion but without success.

So. Mr Clement, we do much appreciate the contribution that you and others of the civilian community make to Landing Day and we will bear your comments in mind in making arrangements for next year's memorial service.

Cemetery Cottage to have a makeover

His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce said, "It had been suggested that, given the costs required to refurbish the cottage, it might be sold on the open market.
"However Executive Council

did not wish to lose the cottage to

the housing pool and decided to proceed with refurbishment."

Also approved by Executive Council was the incremental redevelopment of the Fisheries Department's database. Mr Pearce said the department's current database is, "...rapidly approaching the end of its useful life.

A new post of Database Developer and Systems Analyst will be created within the Fisheries Department for two years from July

Offshore exploration areas will be re-licenced

THE Falkland Islands Government (FIG) is to re-licence some areas for offshore exploration of hydrocarbons.

In his report from Executive Council, His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce said, "Certain oil companies have relinquished a number of blocks which they were awarded in 1996.
"FIG would like to re-licence

these areas under the Open Door Licensing Regulations.'

Mr Pearce said this will require an amendment to the current regulations and ExCo agreed that this

should be made.

He added, "The new arrangements will not affect the Special Cooperation Area or those blocks within twelve miles of the coast or in environmentally sensitive areas."

Nationality Act provides status 'loophole'

COUNCILLORS believe that the effect of the British Nationality Act was to, "...introduce a loophole into the Falkland Islands status provisions," and they are consulting the Foreign and Commonwealth Office on it.

At present, people who apply for naturalisation under the British Nationality Act can acquire status two years earlier than set out in the government's status provisions.

His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce, said that Executive Council (ExCo) discussed the "complicated subject" of naturalisation as a British Overseas Territories Citizen and the relationship between the British Nationality Act 1981 and the provisions in the Falkland Islands Constitution and the Falkland Islands Status Ordinance for the granting of Falkland Islands Status.

While stressing that he was not making a full statement of the law. Mr Pearce explained the problem.

He said that according to the Constitution, a Commonwealth Citizen who dwells in the Falkland Islands "...and who has been ordinarily resident for seven years or longer can apply under the Falkland Islands Status Ordinance for the grant of Falkland Islands Status, subject to certain criteria being met. Successful applicants for Status require a positive recommendation by ExCo."

He continued, "Under the British Nationality Act 1981, persons who have been resident in the Falkland Islands for a period of at least five years, and who are not subject to immigration control, can apply for naturalisation as a British Overseas Territories Citizen. The decision to grant naturalisation is discretionary and taken by the Governor, who can only refuse an application on grounds on which it could be refused in the United King-

"Because the Governor is exercising powers delegated to him personally by the Home Secretary, he acts without needing to consult ExCo. British Citizens as well as citizens of other countries can apply for naturalisation as a British Overseas Territories Citizen. The British Nationality Act applies in the same way to other Overseas Territories.

Mr Pearce said that a person who is naturalised in the Falkland Islands as a British Overseas Territories Citizen automatically acquires Falkland Islands Status. The effect of this in the Falkland Islands is, in short, that the holder of a permanent residence permit may, through naturalisation as a British Overseas Territories Citizen under the British Nationality Act, acquire Falkland Islands Status after residing in the Islands for five years, ie a shorter period by two years than that set out in the status provisions of the Constitution and the Falkland Islands Status Ordinance.

"The only people who cannot take advantage of these arrangements are those who already hold British Overseas Territories Citizenship by reason of their close connection with another Overseas Territory.

Mr Pearce said members of Executive Council felt that the effect of the British Nationality Act was to, "... introduce a loophole into the Falkland Islands status provisions.

"I explained that there was no prospect of an amendment to the British Nationality Act, and that as Governor I was required to implement the law as it currently

Mr Pearce said councillors have written to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office on this subject. .. and there will no doubt be further discussion of the point at issue. Meanwhile the law is as I have

New five pound notes - but no new design

In a paper to Executive Council, the Financial Secretary, Derek Howattt, says there are 19,000 unissued £5 notes left in the Treasury vault, around 18 months supply.

Q HOW much has been spent on Coastal Shipping subsidies and any other costs by the Falkland Islands Government (FIG)/ Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) in the last financial year?

A Economic Advisor, Michael Harte, kindly provided the follow-

ing response.

"Coastal shipping expenditure is no longer paid as a subsidy to the provider. The provider is now directly contracted to FIG to provide shipping services and bears a much higher degree of risk than was previously the case. Also, all local shipping revenue is now returned to FIG

"As previously announced, the cost to FIG is £780.000 per annum. In return FIG receives coastal shipping revenues plus an additional £60.000 per annum for use of the *Tamar* on commercial voyages to Punta Arenas."

"The net cost to FIG is between £580,000 and £620,000 depending coastal freight volumes carried by

the Tamar.

"The near completion of the road network on East Falkland, ongoing road building on West Falkland and the pick up of wool from Fox Bay by the Darwin Shipping

charter vessel means that coastal shipping volumes have fallen off very quickly in the last two financial years.

"Costs to the FIDC, owners of the *Tamar*, associated with on-hire and off-hire survey, major repairs and purchase of assets owned by the previous service provider were some £62,000. The value of assets and spares bought from the previous operators is estimated at £145,000."

Q If the costs were greater than the previous financial year, what was that figure?

A Mr Harte replied, "These costs are greater than those incurred in the last financial year. The coastal shipping subsidy paid in the 2002/03 financial year was £507,000.

"However, competing bids received for the shipping contract are the more appropriate measure. The cost to FIG during the 2003/04 financial year under the competing bid would have been a minimum of £565.000 plus an automatic 10% increase in freight rates from 1 July 2003.

"Each year there would have been an automatic 5% annual increase in the contract price plus actual increases in insurance, bunkers. and regulatory compli-

ance costs.

"All coastal shipping revenue would have been kept by the coastal shipping provider. It is estimated that the cost to FIG in year five of the contract would have been approximately £680,000."

Q Does FIG have a safety net for supplying the West and Islands with a shipping service if the present service completely fails for any reason?

A Mr Harte said, "The coastal shipping provider is obliged under the terms of the contract to provide coastal shipping services irrespective of the vessel used. This means the provider would need to arrange for the charter/use of a alternative vessel to the Tamar.

"Should there be a significant delay in providing services to the West and Islands FIG would seek assistance from third parties such as the Minis-

try of Defence.

"People living on the West and Islands can be assured that FIG will ensure that essential supply services are continued by one means or another."

Music project

THE Community School's Music Department has had donations towards its ambitious composition project for 2005, however more funds are needed.

The department applied for sponsorship from Falklands companies to allow them to bring two composers to the Islands in March next year to lead an exciting composing project with some of the students. Music teacher Shirley Adams-Leach said, "They will hopefully produce a CD of their work entitled the Falklands Suite, depicting the many facets of these islands in music.

"The CD can then be on sale here in the islands and the piece can be entered for international composing competitions."

The project has received donations from the John Cheek Trust, the Shackleton Fund and Seaview totalling £2,000. Mrs Adams-Leach said, "This amounts to about one third of our required amount. Many thanks go to those sponsors for getting us started."

Music students will be fund raising over the next few months and also staging a Variety Show in October/November to help the project become a reality.

Education Board news

FUNDING criteria for Higher Education has been discussed by the Education Board.

Director of Education, Sylvia Cole proposed that slight changes should be made to the eligibility criteria relating to overseas funding of students following Higher Education Courses

She said, "A small amendment was proposed to reword the requirement to suggest that applicants should have both Falkland Islands Status and be Ordinarily Resident in the Falkland Islands.

"It was decided that this proposal should go to Executive Council."

In her Director's Report, Mrs Cole gave an update on consultation on a new school holiday pattern adding that the next stage is public consultation.

She confirmed that she anticipated a "...full staffing complement at all schools from September 1, following a successful recruitment campaign in the UK and elsewhere."

Has your computer modem been hijacked?

TELECOMMUNICATIONS company Cable and Wireless is warning the public about a new menace.

If you discover unexpected international telephone call charges on your bill it can sometimes mean your modem has been "hijacked." Business Unit Manager Brian Summers says, "This occurs when you download (often unwittingly) software that alters the number your computer uses to connect to the Internet.

"For example, rather than using a local access number the computer dials into an international number."

Mr Summers says it is "very important" to exercise caution when on the internet, "...particularly when a site asks you to download material such as special software.

"Unless you are certain of its legitimacy you should not download

any file

Modem hijacking can occur when certain web sites invite you to follow simple instructions to access their information.

Mr Summers says, "These often appear as pop-up windows asking for

permission to download a file and accept the web site's Terms and Conditions.

"It may also indicate that you need a special viewer to view the web site's content or a special dialer to contact their servers to allow you access to the content.

"Once you accept the Web site's Terms and Conditions, a computer file accesses the communications software on your computer and can use your modem to redial phone numbers that are often located in foreign countries such as Tuvalu or Liechtenstein, resulting in international phone charges."

Cable and Wireless recommends the following tips and tools to avoid

hijacking

Do not download any file unless you are certain of its legitimacy. Carefully read the disclaimers (dialogue boxes), the Terms and Conditions and any warnings before downloading information from the Web. This may save you from incurring unanticipated international phone charges. Unless you fully un-

derstand the Terms and Conditions, don't accept them.

 Turn off your computer or disconnect your computer's phone modem line when it is not in use.

Review your network and dial-up connections and remove any connections that you are not familiar with, and verify the phone numbers that are being called. Note, the phone numbers to access "Horizon" are 21000 or 22000.

• If you have multiple users on your computer with separate login IDs, apply restrictions based on the login IDs. (For example, deny children access to installing and downloading software without your permission).

 Install a firewall. A firewall is software or hardware designed to block hackers from accessing your computer. You also might consider increasing the security settings on the operating system software on your computer.

• Ensure you have up-to-date anti-virus software.

RESEARCH which could have help combat toothfish poaching is being carried out by a team of scientists who visited the Falklands last week.

Thirty-one scientists are on board the Nathaniel B Palmer, working on around twenty different projects.

Bill Dietrich, professor of biochemistry and marine biology at North Eastem University in Boston, is interested in the, "adaptational biology of cold living organisms." in particular Antarctic fish.

He has been working in Antarctic waters since 1981 and says the purpose of this latest voyage is, "...to study the sub-Antarctic species that are closely related to the species of what we call the high latitude Antarctic.

"I have worked for some twenty years studying fish at Palmer Station and McMurdoch station, very far south, but I have not had the opportunity to study the fish which would represent essentially the ancestors of the Antarctic fishes.

Professor Dietrich says research into the Patagonian toothfish may help to combat poaching. He said. "It's very interesting in terms of managing fisheries in the southern oceans. This toothfish is basically found in sub-Antarctic waters around the world.

"One of the things we're interested in is the population genetics of the toothfish and developing molecular markers that would allow you to distinguish where various fish populations originated.

That would be useful for detecting piracy and illegal harvesting of these fish

"If we could tell an Indian Ocean toothfish from a Falklands toothfish (upon arrival in ports) then they could be detected and the fishery could be controlled."

Professor Dietrich says it is known that Antarctic fish derive from a group of fish that lived at warmer temperatures and many of these are found around the Falkland Islands. He explained, 'These represent, if you will, the ancestors of the high Antarctic species which evolved to live in the cold as the Southern Ocean cooled, beginning about 25 million years ago.'

He says there is a variety of things the scientists are hoping to learn: "One is the mechanism of evolution; how is

it that the high Antarctic species evolved and what was the genetic starting point for evolution to cold living conditions.

According to Professor Dietrich there are a number of adaptations that Antarctic fish have that are unique and the type that interest him most is the

He explains, "They don't make red blood cells; in the absence of red blood cells they have evolved a bigger heart. their vasculature is much more extensive and what they are doing is pumping a fluid that has physically dissolved oxygen in it. There is no oxygen car-

"We have demonstrated in my lab that the globin genes have been basically deleted from the genome. We call them white blooded fish instead of red blooded.

"It just so happens that one of the species lives in your waters, and we're trying to capture specimens of that because this is a fish that lives at a igher temperature range than the ice fishes in the Antarctic.

Professor Dietrich says the research could have implications for the medical world: "In my laboratory we have been comparing the genes that are expressed by a red blood species and the genes that are expressed by a white blooded species and, using certain techniques, you can find out what genes the red blooded fish are expressing that the white blooded fish are not. These would be genes presumably involved in red cell development.

"We've isolated one of these genes which we've named 'blood thirsty' We've shown in the zebra fish, if you prevent the expression of 'blood thirsty' you don't get red blood cells.

This is allowing us to discover the genes involved in making red blood cells and then the products of those genes would be potentially therapeutic targets for treatment of anaemias and so on.

From the Falklands, the Nathaniel B Palmer heads to South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands where the team will attempt to put down a trawl to 7,000 metres.

Professor Dietrich says they are likely to find new species, "...if we can get the net on the bottom - previously undescribed species.'

Research to help anti-poaching? Farmers are prepared to back their own judgement?

A PROGRAMME for improving stock turned the Goose Green shearing shed, normally a quiet site at this time of year, into a hive of activity last week.

Visiting reproductive technology specialist, Adrian Veitch was hard at work artificially inseminating (AI) up to 60 ewes an hour assisted by a whole host of enthusiastic farmers and a small team of Department of Agriculture (DoA) support staff.

The main types of semen used were Polwarth, Cormo, Dohne Merino and SRS (soft rolling skin) with some Hazeldean merino and Flaxton merino also being used.

The Cormo breed dominated the embryo transplant (ET) side of the operation with quite a few Dohne Merino also being used.

Senior Agricultural Advisor Neil Judd said the programme operated in much the same way as last year with individual farmers choosing their own material and breeds. As such, farmers have, "__risked their own money and backed their own judgement," as to what would best suit their farms and individual circumstances

"The farms have paid for all the materials themselves and have thrown themselves wholeheartedly into the programme - the involvement of so many farmers in all aspects of the programme has been absolutely tremendous."

Agricultural Assistant, Lucy Ellis said that she has had to do very little this year towards the complex synchronisation of the ewes and on-farm organisation of activity, "... farmers really know what they are up to now. so they are just getting on with the task themselves

Ewe preparation is an important part of the programme as it is critical

or being artificially inseminated are in season on the appropriate day and that they are in correct condition to be worked upon. Attention to detail with the ewes helps to ensure the highest level of success is achieved

Four centres have been used throughout the programme; Saladero for the Polwarth National Stud Flock. Goose Green was the centre for five farms; Cape Dolphin for six farms and West Lagoons on West Falkland for themselves and two additional

West Falklands farmers have generally not participated as much in the Al and ET programmes as farmers on the East. Many farms on the West moved to the Polwarth breed ten years to twelve years ago with the importation of the National Stud Flock (NSF) and are, "...already well on the path to converting to the breed," says Mr Judd.

He added, "It is understandable that farmers happy with the progress that their Polwarth flocks have made over this period are content to let the DoA work on the Polwarth breed and to continue to purchase NSF rams each year.

"On the East, it would appear that more farmers are keen to explore alternative breeds and to consider the possibility of becoming ram suppliers themselves.

At Swan Inlet, one of the most recent to join the farming community Andres Short says that he has got rid of all the sheep from his 270 hectares apart from 100 ewes that have had embryos implanted this

Introducing the Dohne Merino. an improved dual-purpose fine wool. meat sheep breed developed in South Africa about 70 years ago, will enable Andres to hopefully, "... fast track and fresh semen supply to other farmers who may want to start

At a cost to the farm of approximately £15,000 Andres feels the 100 embryos are a good investment as Swan Inlet is a small farm requiring a "low quantity, high value project with potential." Andres is quick to admit that he is new to the game and has a lot to learn but adds that there are, "...prospects in the distant future for supplying embryos, semen and live rams to South America as well as to other Falkland Islands

Ted and Sheila Jones from Head of the Bay have had 48 ewes inseminated with semen from the Cormo breed and says Sheila are, "...sticking with wool breeds," adding that they are quite keen to run a terminal sire. possibly Texel, over cast ewes for lambs for the abattoir.

Sue and Hew Grierson are introducing Hazeldean Merino to Blue Beach; a highly productive, high performance strain of merino, bred in the high cold country in New South Wales, it has medium wool and a good

Goose Green Manager Brian Aldridge was pleased with the sixty per cent success he had from a relatively small number of ewes which received embryos last year. His hopes are high for this year - he has prepared forage crops including 16 hectares of swedes and oats for the after care of the animals.

Mr Judd is enthusiastic about the future of AI and ET in the Islands, not so much as a new technology, but rather for its ability to create new options for farmers to explore and improve their own farming circumstances.

He said, "Once a population of high quality animals exists in the Falklands (of any breed of choice), the Falkland Islands will have the ability to use embryo transfer technology to rapidly increase the number of these high quality animals for use by

"It is hoped to carry out major work on the best sheep available next year from the NSF Polwarths and Corriedales as well as farmer owned Cormos and Dohne Merinos."

Mr Judd says that given the correct level of planning and co-ordination, as an example of what could be achieved next year, it is possible to imagine the best 100 NSF Polwarth ewes being turned into approximately 2,000 embryos and implanted into farmer-owned ewes.

Such a boost in the quantity and quality of animals available for use on-farm in a couple of years, would provide an enormous acceleration to the speed of micron and productivity change being achieved by many

General Practice

by the Hospital Administration staff

Who works behind the scenes at the hospital?

BEHIND the frontline staff of doctors and nurses lies a small but highly important support network of which most people are only vaguely aware.

Without that network, however, the Health and Social Services Department would grind to a halt in a few hours. The support staff deserve to be better known!

The cleaners and laundry staff are our first line of defence against hospital-borne infections. This means much more than a flick with a duster and a bit of brushing and morning.

Unlike most overseas hospitals, we do not suffer from the presence of antibiotic-resistant infections in the hospital and, when they do appear from overseas, the incredibly deep, detailed and intensive cleaning soon restores us to a safe condition.

The laundry processes over 1.7 metric tonnes of laundry a year through specialist washers and driers and plays a key role in stopping the passage of infections round the hospital. The ironing generated is enough to make your eyes water!

As a unique Health Service, we often receive visits from visitors to the Islands who work in health and want to see what we do. By far the most common remark from these visitors is how clean the hospital is.

The Reception staff are the true frontline of the hospital because everyone who visits KEMH deals with them in some way or another. They do not, though, just sit behind reception making appointments and logging in arrivals.

They are also responsible for the medical record system with nearly 4,000 active and often bulky files. They pull and replace medical records, operate the patient call and recall systems, file correspondence and records and also provide the 'front desk' service for a huge range of queries, phone calls and requests for help.

At peak times (particularly first thing in the morning) they can be dealing with upwards of 40 calls an hour and multiple calls at the same time. They also receive and forward over 700 pairs of spectacles a year and provide a spectacles repair service.

The kitchen in KEMH might well be the busiest in the Islands, providing 80-100 meals a day (with choices) 365 days a year, for patients, Meals on Wheels, the Day Centre and prisoners.

That, of course, generates a huge amount of cleaning and washing up too, even with an industrial dishwasher to help.

To add to the challenge, the kitchen staff are able to deal with a wide range of special diets – for example sugar free, fat free, gluten free or even all of those at once.

The office staff not only administer the budget of just over £5M, and a staff of over 90, but also organise about 120 Medical Treatment Overseas trips per year to the UK and Chile.

Individual cases can take several days to organise with changed appointments and differing requirements although in the case of emergency aeromedical evacuations, working as a team with the medical staff, they can achieve near

miracles in getting patients off the Islands in a matter of hours.

The admin staff are also the billers and chasers' for the cash the Islands receive for the treatment of foreign nationals and tourists, and are the contact point between foreign insurance companies, patients and FIG. Some cases take hours and hours to resolve, especially when working across time zones which can mean working late or very early in the morning.

Add to that, the routine administration, support for visiting specialists (20 visits a year, 1,500 referrals and over 1,000 reports to be written) as well as our own doctors and surgical team, contracts, and a very considerable word-processing load, and they are never short of work.

Then, of course, there is our Medical Stores which provides the full range of equipment and disposable items (everything from bed pans to syringes and surgical gloves to soap) – keeping track of everything and making sure we don't run out is a major and very complicated task.

Finally, we'd be completely lost without our team of drivers/ security staff who provide a 24-hour. 365 days a year ambulance driver and patient transport service as well as looking after the security of the building and staff throughout the night.

They also provide portering services in the hospital, look after our fleet of ambulances and other vehicles and are invariably willing to help out wherever they can, in the best traditions of the Islands.

All this without any fuss...

Recipes for the Falkland Islands Drunken Winter Stew (serves 4)

Ingredients

3 potatoes, peeled and cubed 1/4 cup chopped onion

1/2 medium head cabbage, sliced 1 can kidney beans, drained and rinsed.

3 cups water

1 (12 fluid ounce) can beer

1 tablespoon Dijon mustard 1/4 tablespoon garlic powder

ground black pepper to taste salt to taste

Method

Bring potatoes, onions, and water to a boil, lower heat to simmer.

Add cabbage and mustard. Slowly add about half the beer (it will foam up a bit). Cover loosely.

Leave to simmer 15 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Add the beans, spices, and more/all of the beer to taste.

Remove lid, let simmer another 10 minutes or until potatoes are tender.

Add water if necessary. Adjust seasoning if needed before serving.

AUSTRALIAN wool markets eased slightly this week, principally as a result of a 2.2% increase in the value of the Australian dollar relative to the US dollar. Competition remained widespread with key topmakers all active.

It should be noted that sound fleece wool of good style was least affected, as were skirting types of low vegetable matter content.

Falkland Island wool is characterized by very low vegetable matter for all main fleece wool lines, and compared to other wool producing nations, for skirting types as well. In addition, wool from dry sheep is generally quite sound in staple strength. Competition for such wool would be expected to be strong in the current market climate

The Australian offering for the week totaled 57,397 bales. 85% of the bales presented for sale actually "changed hands"



Oil shoots above \$42 per barrel

OIL PRICES, reacting to the weekend attacks in Saudi Arabia, rose sharply in New York and London reaching a record 42.33 US\$ per barrel, 2.45 US\$ more than last Friday

In New York, Nymex light crude for July delivery hit \$42.38 per barrel in afternoon trade, up over two dollars on the opening. Mike Fitzpatrick an oil analyst said, ...the market has been taken over by a feeling of panic and vulnerability," everybody is very "anxious" about the psychological shock to the markets.

Bruce Evers a bank analyst from Investec commenting on the terrorist attacks that left 22 dead in Saudi Arabia underlined that "it's evident tactics have changed, terrorists are now after civilian objectives clearly targeting interrupting production"

The Organization of Oil Exporting Countries. (OPEC) failed in its attempt to bring calm to markets even after promising to pump sufficient oil to satisfy world demand

Indonesian Oil Minister and president Purnomo Opec Yusgiantoro, said he wanted a significant rise in production to deflate prices.

"Indonesia's position at the next Opec meeting is that Opec should increase the production ceiling to stabilise prices. "The important thing is the increase should be a significant volume that can reduce prices," stressed Mr Purnomo.

Abdullah bin Hamad al-Attiyaa, the Qatari energy minister, said the "fear factor" had increased, but he added that Opec members would supply "...as much as the market can absorb".

Kuwait's energy minister said his country had already increased production and would lift output further if necessary

"We have additional production capacity that we can use. We are talking about 200,000 barrels per said Sheikh Ahmad al-Fahd al-Sabah

An Opec official who controls 38% of the world's oil supplies and pumps 23.5 million barrels per day, voiced concern about instability in the Saudi Arabia.

Omar Ibrahim, head of Opec's information department, said the group was "concerned about global security and stability, and especially about security in our member countries, including Saudi Arabia and Iraq'

Chilean meat sales will reach \$US350 million

THE CHILEAN meat industry will be exporting \$U\$350 million in 2004 announced Agriculture Minister Arturo Barrera Miranda during the recent Expo-Carne and the biennial meeting of the industry held in Santiago's Machopo Station.

The 2004 target represents a 25% sustained increase over 2003

Of the total \$U\$350 million, 200 million is pork, 100 million poultry, 30 million beef and 24 million lamb and mutton.

Minister Barrera Miranda also indicated that in the second half of 2004, the traceability system for livestock will begin to be imple-

Other ministerial targets are to consolidate the livestock produce certification system; complete the certification process with United States, Korea and China, plus opening further markets; improve the Livestock and Agriculture Service responsible for sanitary monitoring; improve livestock sanitary conditions and promote good livestock husbandry conditions

Mr. Barrera Miranda said the different targets will be implemented with collaboration from the private sector particularly those involved in

the export market.

C24: councillors to deliver 'real message' on self-determination

THE Falklands have a "real message" on self-determination to deliver to the United Nations Decolorisation Committee (C24)

Councillors Mike Summers and Roger Edwards will fly to New York to attend the annual meeting next week. They plan to address the C24 on Friday, June 18.

Councillor Summers said he and his colleague will deliver the message of self determination and, "the right of small countries to choose their own destiny"

An Argentine delegation will also address the meeting.

Mr Summers said it is important that Falklands representatives attend the C24 to deliver the self determination message personally; "Such a message has much more force when delivered by the people themselves (or at least their elected representatives).


"The message is understood by many of the delegates on the C24, and there is sympathy for it."

The voting tradition in the C24 is to have unanimous adoption of a resolution which calls on the United Kingdom and Argentina to solve the sovereignty dispute through peaceful discussions.

Councillor Summers said. "That is hardly objectionable in UN terms; it is unacceptable to us because we have no intention of entering discussions on sovereignty with the Argentines."

Despite the tradition, councillors do not believe attending the meeting is a waste of time. Councillor Summers said, "It is a formal body of the United Nations, and therefore, irrespective of the United Kingdom position, it has some gravitas.

"In any event the Argentines will petition the C24 every year whether we attend or not, and it would be foolish for us not to at-

tend and in effect let them win by default."

Asked if councillors find this voting tradition disheartening, Mr Summers said, "The resolution does not explicitly (or indeed implicitly) support the Argentine claim - it simply calls for resolution of the dispute.

"We are not disheartened by the annual outcome since it does us no harm. There is sometimes frustration that we cannot make more progress, but the status quo is better than losing ground, which might be a danger if we did not attend."

Earlier this week, Councillor Summers played down the importance of a resolution passed by the Organisation of American Status (OAS) calling on Argentina and Great Britain to resume "without delay" sovereignty negotiations over the Falklands, South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands.

He described the OAS as a "re-

gional grouping" with, "...very little political clout in world terms."

He added that any resolution the OAS passes is not binding on any of its members and councillors had expected the move, "...in what is effectively a Latin American club. It has no effect on us or on the United Kingdom."

Mr Summers said the Argentine delegation is likely to refer to the OAS resolution in New York, "...and the several Latin American

countries on the C24 will support them,"

However he added, "It has no effect on what we might say in the meeting."

Councillors Edwards and Summers say they have no plans to meet with the Argentine delegation however Mr Summers explained, "...it is often the case that after the meeting we meet in the chamber.

"If we do meet it will not be by design, but is perfectly possible."

Jailed nurse to appeal sentence

JAILED nurse Denise Schophaus is appealing against her sentence for drugs theft.

In April Ms Schophaus received a number of 36 week sentences to run concurrently after pleading guilty to eight charges relating to the theft of pethidine and forgery in the hospital drugs register.

At yesterday's meeting of the police committee. His Excellency the Governor Mr Howard Pearce asked why the offences of "theft of a class A drug" and "false accounting" were marked in police statistics as "current" rather than "detected".

Chief of Police Dave Morris confirmed that it was because Ms Schophaus was appealing against the sentence handed down by former Senior Magistrate Nick Sat ders, so the case was still considered active. FIBS

Liberation Monday

LIBERATION Day will be celebrated island-wide on June 14, a public holiday.

Residents will mark the occassion with a Thanksgiving Service in Christ Church Cathedral, followed by a ceremony at the Liberation Monument which involves an Act of Rememberance and the laying of wreaths.

The Liberation Monument ceremony will be followed by a civic reception in the Town Hall hosted by His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce.

Argentine film crew visits

AN ARGENTINE television crew is due to arrive in the Islands tomorrow to film a documentary relating to the Falklands War.

The programme will look at the effects of war and footage of the Liberation Day parade is likely to be filmed on Monday.

Also visiting will be two Argentians

Also visiting will be two Argentine war veterans who are travelling seperately from the film crew.

However they are expected to be interviewed by the crew on Mt Longdon and at Darwin/Goose Green.

At the end of their visit in 2002 many SAMA pilgrims said that, despite the fact they are still grieving for lost lives and carrying both physical and emotional scars from what they experienced in 1982, they had a renewed sense of achievement at a job well done, a notion they wanted to relish and feel happy about.

So on Monday, after paying our respects to the many men and women of the task force, let's raise our glasses not only in remembrance of that momentous sacrifice but also in celebration of the extraordinary feats achieved to secure our future.

Curly raises £3,000 in a month

Higher meat prices for 'better quality'

DESPITE the recent price review carried out by the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo), consumers may not necessarily notice a change to the price of meat in stores.

FIMCo director Julian Morris said the company has indicated to retailers what the charges would be for producing meat at the abattoir, however whether or not retailers will chose to buy FIMCo meat or deal directly with farmers, "...remains to be seen.'

Mr Morris said FIMCo's higher price includes an improved service: "We would be doing things in a different way to how they currently happen - with grading and improved quality of meat. Whether the retailers want to pay us for that, remains to be seen.

He said that FIMCo will be able

to supply meat for all 52 weeks of the year: "It's simply a case of whether or not retailers want to pay extra for that or carry on with what

they've got."
Mr Morris added that if retailers want FIMCo to supply them with beef (which is not currently the case), there will be an increase over what they currently pay.

He said this would enable the farmer to be paid more, delivery to Stanley, live grading of animals, higher prices for younger beef animals, supply of beef for 12 months of the year and the storage of meat at Sand Bay for longer.

Mr Morris said, "I think this (price change) will take some time to determine as the retailers obviously have to re-adjust their own

arrangements first."

Licencing review: consultation continues

FOLLOWING the circulation of a questionnaire which sought the views of the public on licencing laws, the Attorney General, David Lang, is to carry out further consultation with Justices of the Peace and Licensees.

Following these discussions, he will submit a paper to Executive Council containing proposals for amendments to the licencing law.

Earlier this year, Mr Lang prepared a questionnaire which was put out for public response.

He said a number of people took the opportunity to make written comments in relation to some of

the ideas put forward for consideration in the questionnaire: "Ideas because some of them, quite deliberately, were contradictory and none of them represented proposals for amendment of the law.

The results of the questionnaire and a summary of the written responses received have been published by Mr Lang. He will use these in his discussions with Justices of the Peace and Licensees.

Copies of the questionnaire replies - 'The Yeses and Noes' are available from the Attorney General's Chambers and the Clerk of Council's office.

Buckle up - it's the law

FROM June 15, the law governing the wearing of seatbelts changes for both children and adults

The amendment to the law requires that (with exceptions) any child being carried on or in a motor vehicle must wear a child restraint (which includes a seat belt) while they are using any road subject to the Road Traffic Ordinance. For the purposes of this ordinance a child means a person under the age of 14 years.

The type of restraint a child must wear varies with his or her age or size. It also requires that adults carried on or in a motor vehicle in any forward facing seat must be restrained while they are using any road subject to the Road Traffic Ordinance with a speed limit of over 25 miles an hour.

Children can only be restrained using a three point inertia reel type seat belt or other restraining device especially designed for the purpose, such as a child car seat, which can be held in place by the restraining action of a scat belt.

A police spokesperson said, "The belt or device used must be suitable for the child's height and weight and be marked with an appropriate British Standard mark or a designated approval mark

"Children cannot wear a lap belt unless they are 12 years old or over, or, are 150 centimetres or more in height. This means that other children cannot lawfully be carried on inward-facing bench seats. They can be carried in a child seat on such seats provided it is adequately restrained by a lap belt."

There are exceptions. The above does not apply to

(a) a "small child" being carried as a passenger on a coach if there is no child restraint suitable for his weight or height and he is wearing a seat belt which is suitable for a large child or is an adult belt. Small child means a child who is aged under 12 years and is under 150 centimetres in height,

(b) a child for whom there is a medical certificate signed by a government medical officer and which states, for reasons specified in that certificate, that it is not medically advisable for the child to wear a child restraint;

(c) a child aged under 1 year in a carry cot provided that the carry cot is restrained by straps; and

(d) a disabled child who is wear-

ing a disabled persons seat belt.

The law applies to all roads within Stanley, Stanley Airport Road, Stanley Bypass Road, Stanley - Darwin Road, the road from the Mount Kent Turnoff to the gate at Port Louis, all roads within MPA and the Mare Harbour Road. It does not apply to any of the roads from Dar-win onwards, any of the roads from the Estancia onwards, the Johnson Harbour Road or the Rincon Grande Road

Adults will also be affected by the changes in the law. Except in relation to some older vehicles imported before 31 March 1996 and which were never fitted with seat belts, adults must be restrained by a three point belt or lap belt whilst travelling in the front seats and (in relation to all vehicles imported since 31" March 1996 and others where fitted) other front facing seats of a motor vehicle whilst travelling on roads that have a prescribed speed limit of over 25 miles an hour.

The police spokesperson said, "This does not apply to inward facing seats such as the bench seats at the very rear of a 110, 90 or earlier series Land Rover or other vehicles with similar inward facing seats, which were legally imported with-out seat belts being fitted "Land Rovers with inward fac-

ing rear seats imported in recent years are believed at least in some cases to be fitted with lap belts and persons sitting in such seats must wear them (they are not suitable for small children).

Again, there are exceptions. The above does not apply to:

(a) a person holding a medical certificate;

(b) a person using a vehicle con-structed or adapted for the delivery of goods or mail to consumers or addressees, as the case may be, while engaged in making local rounds of deliveries or collections:

(c) a person driving a vehicle while performing a manoeuvre which includes reversing;

(d) a qualified driver who is supervising the holder of a provisional licence while that holder is performing a manoeuvre which includes reversing;

(e) a person by whom an official test of competence to drive is being conducted where his wearing of a seat belt would endanger himself or any other person;

(f) a person driving or riding in a vehicle while it is being used for fire brigade or police purposes or for carrying a person in lawful custody and a person being so carried;
(g) a disabled person who is wear-

ing a disabled person's seat belt;

(h) a person driving a vehicle if the driver's seat is not provided with an adult belt:

(i) a person riding in the front of a vehicle if no adult belt is available for him in the front of a vehicle;

(j) a person riding in the rear of a vehicle if no adult belt is available for him in the rear of the vehicle.

The amendment for adults applies to the Stanley Airport Road, the section of the Stanley By-Pass Road between Philomel Street and the turn off to Stanley Fuel Station will no longer be exempt. Stanley Bypass Road, Stanley - Darwin Road, the road from the Mount Kent Turnoff to the gate at Port Louis, all roads within MPA with a speed limit over 25 miles an hour, (i.e. 30 mph) and the Marc Harbour Road. It does not apply to any of the roads from Darwin onwards, any of the roads from the Estancia onwards, the Johnson Harbour Road or the Rincon Grande Road

A period of grace (amnesty) until up to 31 December 2004 will be granted to such owners provided they comply with the following conditions

(a) they notify the police within the next 21 days, either by calling personally, by telephone or in writing, of particulars of the manufacturer, model number and registration number of the vehicle;

(b) they take urgent steps to get appropriate seat belts and child restraints fitted;

(c) as soon as the seat belts are fitted, they are used where the law requires them to be used.

The police spokesperson said, "It should be noted that in some cases some older vehicles will need first to be fitted with anchorage points. If it should prove to be the case that anchorage points cannot be fitted to some old vehicles, Executive Council will be asked to consider amending the law so as to except those vehicles in relation to the wearing of child restraints. Executive Council will also be asked to consider the possible difficulties in relation to the carrying of smaller children on inward facing bench seats.

Speeders targeted



MORE static speed checks are to be held, in an effort to combat speeding in Stanley.

The police committee discussed the issue at the request of Councillor Stephen Luxton who asked for views on whether speed checks should be carried out after dark.

Chief Police Officer Dave Morris stressed that the present policy is that speed checks are carried out af-ter dark only when. "...reports of speeding are received and in well illuminated areas."

Several preventative measures to reduce speed were discussed including the introduction of speed humps and pinch points.

Members of the committee reported excessive night time speeding in the Ross Road East and West areas. One expressed particular concem for the safety of children playing after dark in the Ross Road East area where drivers, "travel in excess of 40mph," on a regular basis.

Taking into consideration the effectiveness of a recent increase in day time speed checks as a deterrent, the committee decided that a more active night-time policy should be undertaken with immediate effect.

Also discussed by the committee was the introduction of more official and efficient driving licenses.

Members opted for the more expensive of two proposals and decided to produce licenses printed with two colours on one side and one on the other.

The licenses will be made of a secure ready-made paper with a chemical chevron watermark running through. It also has visible fibres making it more difficult for copies to be reproduced.

At present a charge of £15 for a new license and £5 for any additional or replacement licences is made. The committee felt the costs of approximately £795 for setting up the new licenses could be recouped through the licensing charges.

A paper is to be prepared for Executive Council by Attorney General David Lang to prevent excessive parking between Reservoir Road and Dairy Paddock Road.

It was suggested that the present parking system used in that area could make it difficult for emergency services to get through when vehi-cles are parked on both the north and south side of the road.

Fewer vehicles consistently park on the north side of the road, therefore the committee agreed that it would not inconvenience many drivers if parking was restricted to the south side.

This arrangement would also give vehicles travelling east the right of way ensuring safety in icy conditions.

Year one's underwater sculpture on show

YEAR one children have showed off their artistic skills to their families in an exhibition of sculpture.

In front of parents and other invited guests, the students gave a short presentation describing how they had produced their sculpture, based on an underwater theme.

Each child produced a papier-maché underwater creation, ranging from fish and turteles to dolphins and jellyfish and the collection was mounted on a stand built specially by Willie Bowles.

Also adorning the stand were shells made from plaster of Paris and beaded bubbles.

Stamina and skill put to the test | Stan brings Kitty's ashes home

THE Falkland Islands Defence Force has held its own against teams from the British Forces in a March and Shoot Competition.

Twenty-four teams of four endured marching over boggy, rough and hilly terrain for about 16km, firing at small targets on a bleak, windy range and freezing cold water crossings when they participated in Exercise Trenchard's Challenge, the march and shoot competition at Mount Pleasant last week

The teams were representative of all three services and included two teams from the FIDF, one of which achieved an impressive third place. First and second places were won by teams from the Royal Highland Fusiliers Recce Platoon.

Captain Jill Hamlin of Media Ops said, "The challenge itself was arduous, requiring determination and stamina to complete and competition was fierce.

The stone runs and boggy ground demanded careful route selection, the climb to the blustery summit of Mount Wickham challenged even the fittest of competitors but with many points up for grabs on the shoot itself, accuracy with the rifle from the standing, kneeling and prone positions was vital to boost each score

After the shoot at Onion Range, the teams raced back towards Mount Pleasant, to face a water crossing task on its lower slopes. Captain Hamlin said, "Carrying a heavy stretcher through a dummy minefield and river was tough, especially

as feet were already sore and bodies ached by this stage but once completed, the end was in sight - uphill, of course!

Major Peter Biggs of the FIDF said the course was "quite demanding" and was pleased with the times registered by the two Falklands teams. He commented, "I was particularly

pleased that the team led by Corporal Tom Blake achieved a well contested third place. The second FIDF team was fifth.

FIDF team one consisted of Corporal Tom Blake supported by Privates Kevin Ross, 'Cleggs' Ross and Craig Paice. The second FIDF team was made up of Major Biggs and Privates Stu Doyle, Mike Harte and Mark

The particular scam causing concern at the moment is from an Australian Lottery' and looks authentic: however it asks for credit card details to allow the processing of a claim payment of \$29.95.

The return address includes a 'Locked Bag' number which, Sergeant Roberts says, confirms that it is not a genuine lottery.

He said. "Locked bag numbers are usually used as a forwarding point for mail and make it difficult to trace.

Island students are rich

I AM responding, in my own right, to the letter in Penguin News which criticised the recent reduction in student grants and described this as 'an ill-considered and knee-jerk deci-

sion'. It was neither!

The proposal had been discussed with councillors over twelve months ago and when, more recently, officers were requested by councillors to scrutinise every budget line (on the assumption that nothing was sacred). the reduction in the Higher Education grant was inevitably going to be reconsidered.

The reduction will apply to all Higher Education students whether they are new first year, or existing second, third or fourth year students at university. I am sorry that the writer seemed unable to clarify the extent of the reduction; I would have gladly supplied the answer, as would any member of Standing Finance Committee, if I had been asked.

Falkland Islands students studying Higher Education Courses in the UK currently receive approximately £8,000 per annum as a maintenance grant. Out of this, they are expected to pay for their accommodation. their food and their personal needs.

From September 2004 this will be reduced to approximately £7,000 per year. A reduction of 121/2% and not 20-25% as suggested by the writer. In addition, the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) funds one return flight per year, plus the stu-dent's tuition fees - these range from £8,000 to £13,000 depending on the student's choice of university and course of study.

From September, Falkland Islands students will receive £7,000 per year and are also allowed to work in their university breaks without this amount being reduced. Most students at universities around the world (not just the UK) receive nothing. If a Falkland Islands student 'barely survives' on £8,000 per year, one has to wonder how these others survive at all!

A contract between two people states clearly what each party can expect. The Student Contract is reciprocal it tells the student that she/ he will receive funding and support for the course in question and it lays out what is expected in return. At no point does it promise three or four years sponsorship at a set amount; I am sure that audit and the Financial Secretary and Councillors would, quite rightly, be most displeased if it did.

Make no mistake, in university (and FE College) circles, Falkland Islands students are rich! Speak to a returning student, ask them about their fellow students and the hardship they endure. If they are at a UK university ask them about the debt that their university colleagues will face at the end of 3 years ranges from £18,000 - £24,000 according to recent research, and that's for a careful student doing his or her best to live sensibly and frugally.

FIG should be proud of its support for overseas students; it is probably far more generous than anywhere else in the world, but, we have reached a point where it can't go on because the goose has ceased to lay the golden eggs and everyone has to

tighten their belt.

If parents have to take out a £1,000 loan which they have to ask their offspring to repay when he or she is earning, its not the end of the world and might even make the student appreciate the £7,000 which FIG is supplying. A local parent recently told me that he thought his offspring had worked harder at his recent course because he had had to provide some of the funding himself and had begun to realise the true value of education

Like the writer of the letter, I also have a son; he's 30 and, having had two years further education study and one year at a college of art and technology, he runs a small computer business from home. He loves his job but he earns only about

£11,000 each year.

Out of that he pays his rent, all his household expenses, runs a small car at the times when he can afford the tax and insurance, buys his food and personal necessities and supports his five year old daughter. We are being unrealistic, if we believe that our current students can 'barely survive' on £8,000

I know that Falkland Islands students away from home (a long way away from home) cannot go home each weekend (nor can UK students, they can't afford it); they have to cover the costs of their laundry etc (so do UK students - see above); and they don't receive student food hampers from home (nor do most UK students because their parents can't afford it but if Falkland Islands parents wish to send a hamper then contact www.studenthampers.com on the internet) but these constraints on our students are allowed for anyway in their generous grant.

Come on parents - recognise the generosity of the government and what the parents of students around the world have known for years. If you have a son or daughter at university it will cost you.

Fortunately here, because the Government is so generous, it costs

you less.

Historic places: get it right!

LAST WEEK'S Penguin News contained parts of my address to those present at the Narrows Bar attending the Goose Green annual Liberation Party- an exclusive club only open to the ones locked up in the Goose Green Recreation Hall by the Argentine invaders on May 1, 1982.

Exclusive because it is for the original people incarcerated in the hall, now including their families or partners for continuity, also including, to coin a modern term, 'their belongers.'

The point of this letter is to complain about the 'poetic license' your paper often adopts.

In my summary of events marking this occasion, I recalled the circumstances when Gerald and Kay Morrison who were shot up at Burnside before the major battle for Goose Green got underway.

This is an historical place name. Another reference to **Burn** was to a shepherd's house, west, upstream from the Sound House at Adventure Sound at Half Way House Arroyo. This house was named **Burnfoot**, again with connotations bought in by the Scottish shepherds employed in the 1800's.

To go back to place names and the bastardisation that has slipped in over the years. Some of these were recorded after the aerial survey in the late 1950's when a ground follow up team came to gather local names for various features. Unfortunately through poor education the pronunciations were

not always as precise as they should have been.

Burnside is a good example, coming from the Scots shepherds, from a "burn" after the small stream that flows through Gill Park, the misnomer as Kiel Park. This park (paddock) got its name from the Indian who stabbed the camp manager Rudd at Rudds Pass on the San Carlos River, north of Doughtys Flat.

The classic one is Cheroogs corner or pond on Bodie Creek camp where shepherds stopped for a cheroot before splitting up to gather sheep of the camp.

Other examples in Lafonia are 'Lagna Verde' and 'Lagan Isla'- the correct names are Laguna Verde and Luguna Isla. In Goose Green we often hear of Trink-li-dar for Tranquilidad and Or-o-kata for Orqueta.

Another important place name that niggles me is 'Port Stanley' instead of Stanley. I think this came about when the West Yorkshire Regiment was stationed in Stanley 1942-44, they adopted the romanticised name of Port Stanley and this was built on by local song writers like the great Des Peck.

If we are to keep our identity intact we must be precise in recording correct detail.

I wonder how many more anomalies haves slipped into Falkland heritage over the years?

Aggression not acceptable

AT THE meeting of Legislative Council on the May 26, I commented that I had received comments about rudeness of staff members at the Tax Office and at Immigration.

The respective managers of those departments were rightly concerned, and we have met to discuss the observations themselves and our joint approach to ensuring that staff are fully aware that services to the public should be delivered with politeness and good manners.

There is no doubt that both of these departments are "at the sharp end", often having to deliver news to people that they did not wish to hear, or with which they do not necessarily agree; and without any doubt members of the public are sometime rude and abusive to members of staff.

However we are fully agreed that retaliation is not the answer, and all must understand the need to act in a professional manner.

Criticism is easy to make about

people who sometimes have to do their jobs in difficult circumstances; what is one persons firmness may be another's rudeness, and some isolated incidents do not make an epidemic.

However if there have been, or there are incidents in the future where members of the public feel they have been badly treated. Ken Eccles at the Tax Office and Robert King at Immigration need to know. Only then can they deal with matters through better training, firmer guidance, or if necessary disciplinary action.

Our joint message therefore to the public is this. Firm and decisive advice to the public is perfectly acceptable; aggression and rudeness is not.

If there are incidents about which you think we should know please inform the relevant head of department, the Chief Executive or a Councillor, so that we can provide the sort of service the public are entitled to expect.

Student's anger at grant cut

In agreement with Veronica and John Fowler's letter in last week's *Pengum News*. I felt it was imperative that a student's view was expressed at the recent news of cuts being made to students grants in higher education.

As a second year student living on the "wrong side of the A3" I have found that I am in fact not at a much greater advantage than UK students, which is a commonly held perception. In fact loans have reflected the rise in living costs and inflation, which our grants have not

Of course I am at an advantage in that I don't have to repay money I receive at the end of my course, but I am also bound by contracts, and under considerable pressure.

At present there are only seven students in higher education, which makes it even more ludicrous that £7000 is to be snatched from the people that need to be qualified in order to be the "back bone" of the Falklands in future generations.

In order to give some evidence and show myself not as a grumbling student, I present my monthly expense; £310 a month rent; an average of £70 a month for gas and electricity, £50 a month for food, plus I also have to pay to get the bus into University as I couldn't afford to live closer than three quarters of an hour away.

My course also requires spe-

cialist text books which are not readily available in the library, and considering that I do six new modules every semester, six text books at an average price of £30 each semester can be painful.

It is unfair for Falkland Islands students to be tarred with the brush of being "rich" in comparison to UK students, as many of my friends at University parents give them extra money on top of their loan, giving them in fact more money per month than me!

As stated by John and Veronica, not every parent can afford to "top up" their children's bank balances, as much as they might want to.

It is distressing that in one breath we are told that we are "investments for the future," and the next, important decisions concerning our welfare are made without even having the courtesy to treat us as adults and discuss possible options.

In my view a possible option could be loaning students £1000, or an agreed amount, in September if the student feels they need the money.

The loan could then be incorporated into the contract that we already sign, to be paid back once back in the Islands.

Remembering Peggy Wilson, 1911 - 2004

MY MOTHER, Margaret Markham Wilson, known as Peggy, died from a massive stroke on February 29, 2004.

She was the oldest daughter of William Markham Dean of the Falkland Islands Dean family who was for many years chairman of the Falkland Islands Company.

Peggy was born in London in 1911 and spent part of her childhood in the Falkands and Patagonia. Her 21st birthday was reported in the paper at the time.

During her life she had four careers, first as an actress until the mid 1940's. During these years she married my father Richard Ross Meadows White - they divorced in 1941

She then trained as an archeologist and ran digs for the Ministry of Works and remarried to Kenneth Wilson also an archaeologist in the early 1960's.

Between the marriages she

adopted my brother an orphan who kept his own name - Peter Andrew Montgomery.

(She also worked as a specialist dressmaker for 6 or 7 years after the war, while my brother, born 1945, was a small child.)

In the early 1960's she and Kenneth Wilson took early retirement in Alderney, Channel Isles and became curators of the Alderney Museum until the early 1980's.

Kenneth died in 1986 and my mother became the Islands archivist researching the genealogy of the islanders. She did this until she was in her eighties when she began to train her successor.

My mother never returned to the Falklands but always liked Island life and it was for this reason she retired to Alderney, and also owned a flat in Malta where she spent the winters up until 2002.

Searching for the wreck of l'Uranie

A TEAM of five self-confessed amateur historians took on the role of explorers at the weekend as they searched for the wreck of the French corvette *l'Uranie*. Here is their diary from the trip.

THE I'Uranie was wrecked in Berkeley Sound, in the bay now named after her on February 14, 1820.

Although the location of the wreck has been discovered before by several groups they have kept the location very much to themselves.

Our group, as divers and amateur historians, with a strong interest in the maritime history of the Falklands, wanted to see the wreck for ourselves and formulated the plan for this expedition over several months.

One of the biggest problems was finding a date that was suitable for the majority of those who wanted to go. This of course turned out to be almost in the middle of winter, but we didn't let that put us off.

The plan was to take the tug Lively to the site and use her as a base for the exploration. The Lively is an ancient wooden harbour tug, she provides adequate accommodation for six people and what she lacks in comfort is made up for in character.

As well as providing accommodation the *Lively* is equipped with a compressor for refilling the scuba cylinders and a small remotely operated vehicle (ROV).

Day one - June 5

The approximate location of the wreck was calculated based on hearsay, rumour, what published information we could find, and a chart of Berkeley Sound surveyed in 1834 by the crew of *HMS Beagle* (Charles Darwin's ship) that showed the position of the wreck (this was later

shown to be very close to the actual site)

Paul Ellis (owner of the Lively). Chris Harris, and Russell Smith departed from Stanley on the Lively at 6.30am. Jeff Halliday and Nick Watson, who both had other commitments, were to travel to the site overland later in the day.

Jeff and Nick arrived at Uranie Bay before the *Lively* and parked their Land Rover at the location on the beach that Neil Watson (the owner of Long Island farm, which borders Uranie Bay) had indicated to them as being near to the site. When the *Lively* arrived, at about 9.30am, she headed right for the GPS

way-point taken from the 1834 chart and, lo and behold, was also heading straight for the Land Rover.

This was a good start, the modern source and the 1834 source agreed, and the weather was great. The day was bright and sunny, with the temperature around seven or eight degrees C, not bad for the time of year.

First dive

While Paul and Russell sorted things out on the *Lively*, Chris (the only non-diving member of the expedition) took the inflatable ashore to pick up Jeff and Nick.

Nick had to leave in the afternoon so it was decided that he and Jeff would dive first. They proceeded to search the south side of a prominent kelp patch but found nothing.

While they were in the water the others deployed the ROV, which was driven by Chris, erratically at first as he was a bit rusty, and Paul. After searching several areas with the ROV, Paul spied a likely looking object, something that looked suspiciously like some timber sticking out of the sand, but the tether was too short to allow a full investigation.

After lunch it was Paul and Russell's turn to dive; but before they went in we were visited by an RAF search and rescue helicopter who put their winch-man on board the *Lively*

for practise.

After the RAF had gone we repositioned the Lively closer to the suspect area using a kedge to hold us in position and stop the boat swinging over the nearby reef, the water depth being only about four metres, with rocky reefs and the suspected wreck much shallower. Paul and Russell entered the water and searched the western end of the kelp patch, where the ROV had picked up the likely object.

Nick had to leave at this time and Jeff ran him ashore in the inflatable. Jeff's inflatable surfing skills turned out to be a bit rusty and he ended up going for a swim, much to Nicks amusement, and Jeff's horror as he was not accustomed to swimming in 5C water while not protected by a dry-suit. We would all have loved to have seen this, but unfortunately Paul and Russell were under water and Chris was operating the ROV.

While the rather damp Jeff was returning to Lively Paul and Russell surfaced yelling something along the lines of "Yahooeurekayipee", which translates to, "I say old boy we have found the wreck, what."

Paul and Russell submerged again to further investigate their find.

At 3.30pm they were back on board and reporting finds of timbers and copper fastenings sticking out of the sand, along with other artifacts such as iron wheels, bricks (oven bricks?), a large circular thing (possibly a coil of wire rope) and other debris.

With sunset rapidly approaching there was no time to do another dive so we moved the *Lively* to a safe an-

chorage for the night.

While we were all having a cup of coffee and watching video footage from the ROV, the generator died. Investigations indicated that the trouble was terminal, which was bad news as it meant that we would not be able to use the ROV tomorrow.

Day two People started stirring as light started to filter into the cabin through the skylight/hatch. A fine bright day with a few patches of frost on the deck. Barometer 995mb and steady. The wind was westerly about force

We moved the *Lively* closer to the dive site and Paul, Russell, and Jeff suited up and went for a dive. Russell took his digital camera along for this dive.

Chris was left to keep an eye on the boat and to get an accurate fix on the wreck site using GPS. While Chris was watching the boat he heard a bit of a commotion in the water and saw a very large bull sea-lion doing battle with what appeared to be a large octopus.

The sea-lion was having trouble scoffing the octopus because it kept wrapping itself around the sea-lion's head; naturally after a minute or so the octopus met its end and made the sea-lion's breakfast.

All this took place about 200m from the divers and Chris was expecting three divers to do Polaris missile impressions at any moment, but the sea-lion stayed away.

At 11.25am the divers were back on board. They reported finding extensive evidence of the wreck with timbers, fastenings, wheels, large areas of rust (these were probably the water and vegetable storage tanks), and pieces of pottery.

This dive was the last that we had time for on this visit to the site so once the divers were changed out of their dry-suits and everything was stowed we weighed anchor and were under way at noon.

We had a very pleasant run down the south coast of Berkeley Sound, passed Kidney Island at 14:10 where we were treated to a fine display by a school of Peales dolphins.

We were back in our berth at FIPASS, Stanley, at 3.30pm.

Everybody had a great time and will no doubt be back to dive this site again, but probably overland as now that it has been located that is the easiest way to operate.

We are now in the process of deciding what wreck to try to locate next; we have a few in mind it is just a case of prioritising. Everybody is enthusiastic about taking part in the next expedition. Next time we will try to do it in the summer!

Members of the Fire Service have worked hard throughout the year for several charities although their officially 'adopted' charity is the Stephen Jaffray Memorial Fund

Following on from the fire-engine pull and the wheelie bin clean, the Firemen's Ball held on Saturday night proved highly popular

Total funds raised at the function were £2,700, £1.200 of which was from raffle tickets. The total raised from all three events has now reached a staggering £4.334 for the fund

Stephen Jaffray worked as a firefighter in the Falklands service before he died aged just 21 years old, in

The circumstances experienced by Stephen's family leading up to his death in hospital in Montevideo and Stephen's wish that on his return to the Islands he would hold fund-raising events to repay the huge financial and emotional support he and his family had received prompted the establishment of the

Stephen's fund is run by a group of trustees and its aim is to help families who experience the misfortune of having a family member sent overseas due to medical reasons and can not afford (or are experiencing financial difficulty for some reason) to travel with them and/or offer support. Funds are predominantly used for flights and lodgings.

The Stephen Jaffray Memorial Fund has helped many families over the last eleven years - the first fundraising event was held in September 1993 and the first family benefited from this just two months later in November.

Nearly all who have had help have in turn raised money, however the Trustees say, "... people are in no way expected to pay back any money

"It is a system that works remarkably well and anyone that has benefited from it will remember the tremendous relief of knowing that you are not on your own.

The present trustees are Nannette Morrison, Dennis Middleton, Morgan Goss and Georgina Anderson Smith

Chief Fire Officer, Gardner Fiddes said the budget cut to the holiday credit scheme means, "...the fund is going to be used even more now that people don't have that to fall back

Fund-raising for the Stephen Jaffray Memorial Fund has been extremely successful this year.

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News from the June meeting of the Planning and Building Committee

By Graham France

IN complete contrast to last month's meeting, which was a record in terms of time taken at single (open session) sitting of the Committee, this was perhaps the shortest with just over half-anhour taken to review the business before members.

The Hon Richard Cockwell, having returned from other government business, chaired the meeting which was also attended by the Hon Norma Edwards, Gerald Cheek, Les Harris and Mike Harris.

Mike McLeod was indisposed and sent his apologies and later in the meeting discussion took place on who might be recommended to Executive Council to take the place of Paul Phillips who, as reported last month, had resigned his membership. Just one member of the public attended to view the proceedings.

Probably contributing to the shortness of the meeting, no applications for renewal of temporary planning permission were to be considered and the first submissions were two that had been deferred at the last meeting.

Officers reported very little progress with gaining more details so both, FILO's change of use from shop to office in Barrack Street and Stanley Sports Association's proposed improvements to existing drainage to the racecourse, were again deferred.

Nine new applications included three dwellings, all of which received conditional planning permission, and were for Steve and Janice Dent's house, also a Portakabin for domestic storage, at 19 Hansen Hill. Suzanna Clarke's house at 18 Hansen Hill, and the house with an attached garage on the Old BFFI Site for the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

Also receiving conditional planning permission were Richard Fogerty's proposal to replace his garage at Stone Cottage on Bypass Road. Stanley Sea Cadet's container siting at the Canache recreation area, and Government's security screening facility on the Public Jetty off Ross Road which is intended to be in place in time for the next tourist season of cruise ship visits.

In addition to those first applications which were again deferred, two new submissions were also deferred due to lack of information. Gavin and Deidre Marsh's scheme to extend their mobile home on Murray Heights and Kevin Connolly's proposal to provide off-street parking at his home on King Street.

Due to its proposed location being a considerable distance from a designated road, the house to be built from four Portakabin units at Bombilla House Paddock for David Triggs and Amy Jonson does not require planning permission.

However, the Building Adviser was able to report he had visited the site the previous day to assist the applicants with their application for a building permit, and fully expected to give a positive report at the next meeting.

Next came a report on those building permits which had been or were shortly to be issued since the last meeting of the committee. There were seven of these, including three dwellings, but eight others needed further information which it was hoped would soon be received.

Just one application was before members for an off-street parking grant: Mr and Mrs Graham Taylor's proposal for works at the rear of 55 Fitzroy Road and fronting Davis Street and this, lying as it did within the "core area", was approved.

The next meeting of the Committee is scheduled to be held in the Liberation Room at the Secretariat on Thursday, July 1, commencing at 9am.

Q How many residential dwellings including houses, flats and mobile homes are there in Stanley.

A A spokesperson for the Environmental Planning Department said, "Our current best guess is 980."

Q What is the total amount of the contract per annum to the waste disposal operation? How much revenue will the FIG receive from the new wheelie bin charges per annum.?

A Deputy Financial Secretary, Ketth Padgett, provided the following response

ing response
"It is estimated that the waste disposal contract will cost £86,800 in 2004/05. (This figure excludes the costs associated with the depreciation of the refuse truck and wheelie bins which will amount to another £13,800).

"It should be pointed out that Members did not agree to a charge for wheelie bins as the question suggests, or a standing charge for refuse collection, as was originally suggested to the Standing Finance Committee.

tee.
"Instead, it was agreed that a general service charge for all domestic properties would be introduced. This would be cou-

pled with the discontinuation of the current standing charge for water supply and supplemented by a specific charge for non-domestic waste collection and disposal.

"The total costs of providing water and refuse collection to properties are estimated to amount to £361,000. It is estimated that the service charge on domestic properties will raise £202,000.

"If total revenue from metered water and refuse collection from non-domestic properties is added (£132,000) total revenue will amount to £334,000.

"The end result is that the total revenue will fall short of the total direct costs of supply by £27,000."



Stuttering or stammering in young children

I AM often phoned by parents who are concerned that their young child has suddenly started to stutter / stammer.

Stuttering or stammering consists of interruptions to the smooth flow of speech. The person who stutters may:

• Repeat sounds, syllables, words or phrases

• Lengthen some sounds in words

•Block or get stuck on sounds •Avoid looking at you when speaking

 Blink or have unusual body or facial movements.

About 5% of children start to stutter, usually around the ages of three to four. It typically occurs as children are starting to put words together into short sentences. The onset of stuttering can be mild or severe. Many children improve as they get better at expressing their thoughts.

What causes stuttering?

There are many theories and popular beliefs about what causes stuttering. However, the cause of the disorder still remains a mystery

We think that stuttering is most likely due to some problem with the neural processing (brain activity) that underlies speech production. Whatever the problem is, however, it seems to be almost entirely confined to speech production, and there are no basic differences that distinguish clearly between people who stutter and people who do not. For example, people who stutter are not as a group less intelligent, or less well co-

ordinated and so on, than people who do not stutter.

Stuttering is thought to be a physical disorder and is not thought to be caused by psychological factors such as nervousness or stress, or parenting practices, or the way parents communicate with their children when they are young.

Stuttering does tend to run in families, however, the precise nature of its inheritance is unknown at present.

In what situations does stuttering happen?

In general children speak less fluently under certain conditions:

☐ When they are very excited ☐ When they are tired or ill ☐ When they are competing

☐ When they are competing with others who are speaking

When they are trying to tell you about something which is difficult for them to express, something which might happen or something which happened some time ago

☐ When they are using new words, or new ways of organising the words they know.

Some things parents can do

Speak to your child slowly. This will encourage your child to speak slowly too.

Try to arrange things so your child can speak without being interrupted.

Remind all family members to wait their turn – your child too.

Reduce the number of questions you ask your child.

Say something positive about your child's speech.

Reduce any pressure or stress

on your child.

Build as much self esteem as possible.

☐Encourage talking – do not speak for your child.

Say slow down or "stop" ONLY if this helps your child; better still, slow down your part of the conversation.

☐Be a good listener – listen more than talk.

□ Provide a good speech model.
□ Keep your part of the conversation slow, simple and releases

Don't ask your child to repeat things.

If your child mentions speech difficulty, let your child know that everyone finds it hard to talk at times.

Seek help from a speech and language therapist if:

 Your child is blocking - getting stuck.


 Your child is stretching out some words.

 Your child is having problems with most words, and communication is difficult.

 You are worried about your child's speech.

Treatment:

There are many different treatments for stuttering. I favour an evidence- based approach to treatment for stuttering. This means that treatments are backed by scientific research to support their effectiveness. I believe it is better to seek advice while the child is still young, ideally before they start school, rather than "hoping they will grow out of it".



Wool report - week ending June 4

by Neil Judd, Wool Advisor, Department of Agriculture GENERAL OVERVIEW

Australian wool markets were reported, "quite firm" this week with strong buying interest from China as well as key European topmakers. However when prices are expressed in terms of pence per kilogram clean, it can be seen that most of the "shine" is removed from the market. This is a result of a major reduction in the value of the Australian dollar relative to the UK £ and the US \$ over the last few

As a consequence of the weakness of the Australian currency, price gains were basically removed for most micron categories. As shown in the attached Micron Price Guide.

South Africa also suffered from currency volatility, with the strength of the "Rand" leading to a fall in the overall value of South African wool.

The Australian offering for the week totaled 58,487 bales. 87% of the bales presented for sale actually "changed hands" with the remaining 13% passed-in. In South Africa 9,957 bales of wool were offered for sale, 87% were sold.

Torres del Paine extends season

TORRES del Paine National Park. one of the main attractions of Chilean Patagonia has become a growing magnet mainly for foreign tourists resulting in the visitors season being extended to almost nine months.

According to Jose Kusanovic manager and partner in Las Torres hostel, "activity during the last sea-son was up 20% and for the coming season we're almost fully booked'

The number of tourists staying at the hostel during the 2002 season was above 8,000, and in 2003, "...we almost reached 10,000, without including camping and cabins where another 30,000 people stayed overnight, also a 20% increase."

As to the coming season, "We're fully booked for November, December, January, February and almost all of March," says Mr. Kusanovic who credits success to a long, constant effort by local investors and, "government and private promotion both in Chile and overseas.

Mr Kusanovic said that when he first arrived in 1995, the season would begin half way through November, it lagged in December and picked up again January and February, "but it was all over by March

However, "Last season we had an excellent March and April, and we now open September 1, and the high season begins in October," revealed Mr Kusanovic, who added that improvements in the hostel are ongoing. "We're doubling bed capacity and for 2006 we plan to have 20 five star suites, to satisfy upper level

Mr Kusanovic complained about difficulties in reaching the Park, par-ticularly by air. "If we had a proper airport in Puerto Natales things would improve greatly We recently invited forty tourist promoters from overseas and they never reached us simply because flights to the south were overbooked.

Official statistics from the Chilean Forestry Corporation responsible for the protection of parks, natural reserves and natural monuments, indicate 166.230 visitors in 2003, with a clear majority of foreigners, 100.071

The 2003 numbers represent a 10.1% increase over 2002, however it was foreigners who mostly contributed with a 19.9% expansion. Americans, followed by Germans, Spaniards and British make the bulk of foreign visitors.

Of the total 2003 Conaf numbers, over half of the 86,467 visitors, (of which 61,533 are foreigners) visited Torres del Paine

This represents a 13.3% increase over 2002, but for foreigners the increase was 22 1%.

007 campaigns to save the whale

IRISH actor Pierce Brosnan, famous for his 007 role in the James Bond films, has launched an international campaign to help save

Mr Brosnan who identifies himself as a strong environmentalist and protector of weaker animals. together with wife Keely Shaye-Brosnan organised the ceremony for the "Song of the Whale" charity in St. Katherine Docks, Londons premier marina.

The famous actor has become the spokesperson for the international. Fund for Animal Welfare, (IFAW), which among other tasks is involved in the designing and building of a three million US dollars, 21 metres long vessel that will undertake scientific research cruises and educational projects with the purpose of saving whales, particularly those species in danger of extinction.

IFAW Executive Director Fred O'Regan said the support of Mr. and Mrs Brosnan was "vital" for making the "Song of the Whale" project possible, underlining the couple's commitment to saving endangered whales. "They are environmentalist fighters besides being two wonderful and charitable persons," said Mr O'Regan.

Increased Uruguayan meat exports

URUGUAYAN beef exports during the first five months of 2004 increased 70% compared to the same period a year before.

According to the latest release from the National Meats Institute. (INAC), between January and May, Uruguay sent overseas 267 million US dollars in beef and lamb. compared to the 157 million US dollars of the same period in 2003.

The total volume in the first five months reached 143,886 tons while in 2003, 129,171 tons.

Higher prices had a greater impact in overall revenues.

In 2003 the average Uruguayan ton of exported beef was selling at 1,017 US dollars and lambs at 1.653 US dollars; in 2004 prices are; 1,497 and 2,305 US dollars.



Chief Justice rejects jailed nurse's appeal

A NURSE who was jailed in April for stealing a class A drug from the hospital has had an appeal against her sentence refused by the Chief Justice

Denise Schophaus received a number of thirty-six week sentences after she pleaded guilty to eight offences relating to the theft of drugs and forgery of a drugs register.

In a judgement released yesterday afternoon, Chief Justice James Wood "confirmed" the sentences imposed upon Ms Schophaus by the Senior Magistrate, Mr Nick Sanders, in April.

The defendant was convicted on four counts of theft of drugs from the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital where she was employed (three counts related to the theft of pethidine, a Class A drug, and one of paracetamol), and four counts of making a false instrument.

The Senior Magistrate imposed no penalty for the theft of paracetamol.

Justice Woods says the Senior Magistrate was correct to sentence Ms Schophaus to seven concurrent 36-week sentences because, "...whilst the offences arose on a variety of dates within a period of five months, they are in my mind representative of a single course of events occasioned in a broadly similar

manner in similar circumstances."

When challenged with the offences, the defendant denied them. It was only on the first day of her trial that she changed her plea to one of guilty on each count.

one of guilty on each count.

Justice Woods says, "Whilst this late change undoubtedly had the merit of avoiding the necessity for witnesses to give oral evidence, little credit is to be given to the defendant for her late change of plea.

Due to her denial that the signatures in the register were hers, it had been necessary for the Crown to obtain expert evidence as to handwriting and had secured the services of an expert witness. Similarly, other witnesses had the prospect of giving oral evidence up until what was virtually the last moment.

"The sentencer reduced the sentence of imprisonment he imposed by approximately one-sixth for this reason. This is, in my view, as great, or greater, a reduction as the defendant had any right to expect, and I will not disturb it."

The Chief Justice says the most serious element of the case, was that the offences were committed by a member of the medical staff given access to dangerous drugs by reason of the position of responsibility held by her

He says, "The thefts occurred in

breach of the trust vested in her. The capacity to commit these offences arose entirely by virtue of that position of responsibility, and could not otherwise have taken place."

In the appeal, Ms Schophaus' legal representatives submitted that the value (that is the financial cost to the medical authorities) of the drug was small and this factor should weigh in favour of the defendant.

Justice Woods says, "I do not agree. The system of controls imposed by the medical authorities to secure the safe-keeping and proper use of this drug is not to secure its financial value.

"It is to secure the proper use of a dangerous substance and to prevent its misuse by any person."

Before reiterating his rejection of Ms Schophaus' appeal, Chief Justice Woods comments on her lack of "regret" at her offences.

He writes, "In my view the defendant has shown little if any remorse, and her regret seems to me to relate more to her apprehension, conviction and sentence.

"Indeed, the defendant took every opportunity to deny responsibility (including the innocent involvement of a colleague) until the very last moment.

"This is not indicative of remorse."

Seismic 3D data ready this month

SEISMIC data collected in the Falklands is undergoing a fast track processing route and should be ready for interpretation at the end of the month.

Penguin News yesterday contacted Dr Colin Phipps. Chairman of Desire Petroleum plc. to ask if he could confirm rumours that oil giant Shell had shown interest in returning to the Falklands to carry out exploratory drilling

Dr Phipps said he could say nothing about. "... who might or might not be coming in. This is something that would have to be put out to the Stock Exchange."

However he said all the 3D seismic data recently collected in the Falklands has been loaded for "fast track" processing, "... and it all should be ready for interpretation at the end of this month or the beginning of next month"

He said the data will take approximately six weeks to interpret, then we'll know what our principle objectives are and we will be

able to sit down and hopefully organise a deal for exploratory drilling in tranches C and D."

Councillors in Washington

TWO Falklands councillors have been the guests of the US State Department.

Councillors Mike Summers and Roger Edwards spent a day at the US State Department, a visit coordinated by the British Embassy in Washington DC. The pair met with Mr Leonard Kusnitz, Deputy Director of Brazilian and South Cone Affairs.

In New York they lobbied representatives from a number of nations and had dinner with the representatives from the Missions of Uruguay and Chile

They will address the United Nations Decolonisation Committee today.

Patrolling Sigma aground

FISHERY patrol vessel. Sigma, ran aground at South Georgia earlier this month. a Fisheries Department spokesperson has confirmed.

Marine Officer Jon Clarke said that due to what is believed to have been a fault with the variable pitch propeller, Sigma "just touched" the beach at King Edward Point on June 9.

The vessel was able to come off the beach again under its own effort.

Penguin News has so far been unable to contact the vessel's owners to discover if Sigma sustained any damage during the incident.

THE Falklands tourism industry has some ground to make up following the ill considered increase in the passenger landing levy announced by the government last month.

Everyone was grateful for the supportive sentiments expressed by the Executive Director of the International Association of Antarctic Tour Operators. Denise Landau, over charter flights earlier this year when she strongly condemned Argentine interference and reiterated the cruise industry's faith in the Islands.

Back in January, Ms Landau said. "We're sorry the Falklands is losing business..." due to Argentina's "irrational decision". However one could

forgive Ms Landau and her colleagues for now feeling otherwise.

For how have we repaid this loyalty? By slapping a surprise increase of £5 on them for every passenger they bring to our shores. (Not to mention the fact cruise liners pay twice the level of harbour dues expected from other

Despite Councillor Summers' words that the industry had been warned the levy increase was on its way, many cruise companies themselves dispute this and it genuinely does seem to have taken them by surprise.

What a backward step to take - particularly in light of the uncertain future of fishing, when we really need to secure our place as a world class

destination.

Instead of making it easier for cruise ships to visit, we've offered up even less incentive for them to include the Islands on their itineraries. We're practically driving them into Argentina's ports. As one operator said. "First it's the charter flight problem and now a silly cash grab tax. Maybe Ushuaia ain't so bad after all."

I know we need to provide improved (and expensive) port security in accordance with international guidelines and pressure. But, in an act of goodwill, couldn't we have at least given the industry a year's notice and asked them to begin paying the extra £5 from the 2005/6 season onwards? With an estimated 35.000 visitors expected in the Islands next season,

we're asking the industry, who don't have time to recoup the money from their clients, to absorb approximately £175,000.

This isn't exactly an act of gratitude for their support against Argentina's

charter ban, is it?

However, the damage is done. We've sent a disappointing message out to the industry and hopefully it is too late in the year for them to exclude the Falklands from their itineraries.

But now we need to work on the future. It's imperative to ensure the government doesn't make a habit of this when the budget round approaches again. We must not use the soft target of cruise companies to tap in to for extra funds.

If the government announces yet another increase next year, we may as well wave our tourism industry goodbye.

The patience of the cruise companies is limited. We've already tried that patience, let's not push it with further rises in tax.

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News from the Development Board

AI and ET programme: a 'slick operation'

OVER 2,000 ewes were artificially inseminated during the Department Agriculture's intensive programme.

A further 400 ewes received em-

bryo transplants (ET).

The Director of Agriculture. Phyl Rendell, was enthusiastic about the programme in her report to the Falkland Islands Development Board on Tuesday.

Mrs Rendell told the meeting it is hoped that with (European) Stabex funding a larger ET programme can be embarked on next year to speed up the improvements in stock with a possible 3-4,000 animals receiving embryos. This funding will be confirmed at the end of the month.

Mrs Rendell recorded her thanks to the Department of Agriculture staff's, "slick operation," and also to Falklands Landholdings staff for their help with the programme, in particular Brian Aldridge and Keith Alazia.

Staff at the Department of Agriculture have been working on the details as to how the Pasture Improvement Programme will proceed over the next four years.

Farmers will have an opportunity to question staff about the programme during Farmers Week in July, when the department will give a presentation over two days.

Mrs Rendell said from now on the, "... farmer will be in the driving seat, getting the best deal he can for his farm with his allocation.

The recent Road Shows at Hope Cottage, Goose Green and Fox Bay organised by the Chief Executive were deemed a success with some "lively debate" taking place

Mrs Rendell said the agricultural side emphasis is being placed on, "...accountability and scrutiny of how money is invested." She said. "Those attending were made aware of this.

Mrs Rendell said that much of the money for agricultural projects is to be drawn down from Stabes. funds and the department has. its work cut out to demonstrate increased profitability on farms.

New quarantine form to be drafted

IN AN effort to demonstrate the Falklands is serious about protecting its disease-free status, a quarantine declaration form is being introduced

Councillors responsible for Agriculture have requested that the Departments of Agriculture and Customs and Immigration press ahead with a declaration form in addition to a general review of protocols and procedures.

People entering the Islands will be required to complete the form.

Falkland Islands Development Corporation General Manager Julian Morris felt it would be a, powerful tool for tourism."

The Director of Agriculture, Phyl Rendell, agreed. She said,

.. well heeled visitors will approve of this as a security measure as a similar system is used in Antarc-

Other members of the board felt it was not tourists or fishermen but local people who would need to be targeted, as they frequently import products such as meat in to the Islands

The meeting heard there have been some reservations expressed by the Customs and Immigration Department as to the logistics of implementing such a form however members of the Development Board felt they were not asking Customs to do, "...any more than they should be doing now."

Veteran killed in Liberation Day bomb attack

A FALKLANDS veteran has been killed by a car bomb in Iraq on Lib-

eration Day.

Former Colour Sergeant, Keith Butler, who served with 3Para in the Falklands War in 1982 and returned to the Islands with 2Para in 2000, was killed by a car bomb in Baghdad on June 14, while he was working for a UK-based security

Mr Butler was, "...providing security for personnel and assets involved in the valuable rehabilitation of the power infrastructure," a spokesperson for Olive Security said

Chairman of the Falklands Branch of the South Atlantic Medal Association, Mr Terry Peck, is to send a message of condolence to Mr Butler's family, on behalf of the people of the Falkland Islands.

Mr Butler fought in the battle for Mt Longdon in 1982 and returned in March 2000 for the laying up of the 2Para colours in Christ Church Cathedral.

Falklands Conservation Trustee receives CBE

A UNITED KINGDOM Trustee of Falklands Conservation has been named in the Queen's Birthday Honours List.

Professor John Croxall, head of conservation biology at the British Antarctic Survey, has been awarded the CBE for his services to ornithology. Professor Croxall is a Trustee and former Chairman of Falklands Conservation.

Trudi and Annie's incredible 100 mile achievement

TWO Falkland women have completed the extraordinary task of walking one hundred miles nonstop, in under thirty hours.

At noon on Friday, June 11. Stanley's Trudi Clarke and Annie Pitaluga of Salvador left the jetty at North Arm heading for Stanley, raising money for the Falklands Chapel at Pangbourne and the '82 Trust, a charity which helps war veterans suffering from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder

Trudi said the plan was to try to walk "virtually non-stop" only pausing for food and drink and to tend to their feet at set periods of time and distance.

The plan went by the way very early on and the first stop was at 5.30pm at the Walker Creek turn-off approximately 20 miles from North Arm.

It was at this point that Trudi found she had some significant blisters, which her husband Marvin described as. "...the skin peeling off as she removed her socks." The damage was tended to and after a stop of twenty minutes to take on food and water the pair set off for Goose Green. They arrived at the settlement's shearing shed at 9.30pm where the lights were on and hot water was provided.

and hot water was provided.

Trudi said she and Annie left Goose Green at about 10pm in. dark and spooky." conditions without a destination point in mind but agreeing to keep going so long as all was well.

On arrival at Guttery Pass, Marvin provided hot food and drink and it was at this point Trudi and Annie felt that a rest of several hours might be appropriate.

However, not being short on determination the gutsy pair decided, after having had their refreshments, to move on at 1.15am in the knowledge that it would not be possible to stop for any lengthy period of time after this point; as Trudi said, "It was all or nothing from there on in."

At the half way point at 2.30am, the weather was, "... at its best for walking and things were still progressing reasonably well with us averaging three miles per hour," said Trudi.

A short stop at the Swan Inlet River at 4.15am was the next break and then on to the Green Pen where they arrived at 8.30am. Trudi and Annie enjoyed a welcome though hardly leisurely breakfast, before they departed just 25 minutes later into a sunny morning.

The next stop was several miles to the west of Bluff Cove where. Trudi said. "Stanley was within our sights. Our feet and joints were aching but lowered spirits were coupled with the determination to succeed."

"As we arrived in the area of Wall Mountain several vehicles from Stanley arrived to offer much welcomed support which was greatly appreciated - just what was needed."

Felicity. (Trudi's daughter)

joined the walkers at this point and stayed with them to the end - the Liberation Memorial on Ross Road.

Trudi said. "The glow of Stanley lights beckoned as darkness descended for the second time and the desire to succeed having got this far, again kicked in."

Rounding Sapper Hill to welcome encouragement, the intrepid pair finally arrived at the Liberation Memorial at 7.30pm to a gathering of well-wishers and supporters

Overall, they completed the walk in a much faster time than was expected, walking for 29.5 hours

and stopping for a total of two hours throughout. They had originally expected the walk to take 44 hours to complete

hours to complete.

Trudi said, "The walk in the main was enjoyable, but I am pleased to have had company, especially during the hours of dark-

"There wasn't a point where I felt I would have to give up but there were several low points and where the road had recently been graded made the surface extremely difficult and painful for walking.

"The supply of hot food and drink was essential as well as the verbal encouragement given at various stages throughout."

The only negative point about the whole challenge for the walkers was the speed at which some drivers passed them on the Mount Pleasant road. Trudi said, "We were showered with rocks, which were extremely painful and potentially dangerous without any consideration whatsoever."

However Trudi said she is extremely grateful to everyone who helped her and Annie and to those who generously donated to the fund raising efforts. "...while this was a significant personal achievement, it was the support and donations that we received which made it all worthwhile."

Funds raised for the charities are estimated to be around £1.100 however, the account will remain open until the end of June should anyone wish to make a further donation.

C24: Falklands v Argentina tomorrow

TWO Falklands councillors take on the Argentine Foreign Minister tomorrow at the United Nations Decolonisation Committee (C24).

Councillors Roger Edwards and Mike Summers will be emphasising the significance of self determination for non self governing territories, while Minister Rafael Bielsa will insist on Argentina's "un-renounceable" rights over the South Atlantic Islands, their territorial integrity with Argentina and demand the resumption of Falklands sovereignty talks with the United Kingdom.

This will be the second time Mr Bielsa addresses the C24 although the official policy of President Nestor Kirchner's administration is to ignore Islanders and their "pretended" self determination claims.

Despite his government's troublemaking reputation after interference with the Falklands' main industries, fisheries and tourism, the Argentine Foreign Minister expects to have a "social and informal" exchange with Councillors Summers and Edwards, reports the Argentine

Earlier this week, Rafael Bielsa said he believed Falkland Islanders will soon look to Argentina for support, rather than the United Kingdom

He told Argentine newspaper La Nacion the change would happen when Argentina was conomically stonger: "When the country is definitely a serious country and can offer good health, education and well being, the Islanders are not going to look twelve thousand nautical miles away for what they have in Argentina."

He added, "The government will go on making our claims at international forums and maintaining for as long as necessary that the Islands are Argentine"

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
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Déjà vu for Search and Rescue team

THE lives of two Spanish fishermen have been saved in two separate rescues, on two consecutive days, in two remarkably similar incidents by the Royal Air Force (RAF) Search and Rescue team from Mount Pleasant (MPA).

The team consisted of the pilots. Flight Lieutenants Olly Padbury and Andy Doyle, radar-operator, Sergeant Zack Stubbings and winchman. Sergeant Chris Scurr

They were first called out on Thursday. June 10, to aid a sailor with severe abdominal pains on board *Ferralemes*. 50 nautical miles south of MPA

A military spokesperson said. "The seas were very rough so the trawler was being tossed by the swell, making it a very difficult winching job for Sergeant Scurr but, despite the demanding conditions, the patient was successfully winched aboard and taken to Stanley hospital

"There he underwent a life-saving operation on a perforated stomach ulcer and is now well on the road to a full recovery"

It was the first deck-winching operation for one member of the team. Sergeant Stubbings, who is serving in the Falklands for the first time

Just one day later, the same

crew found themselves in a virtually identical situation when a Spanish fisherman required emergency evacuation from his trawler, the *Tuecro*, this time 140 nautical miles to the north of MPA. He too, was suffering from severe abdominal pains

The military spokesperson said. "The seas remained rough creating a tricky winching situation and if he had not been whisked away to Stanley hospital by the RAF team, it is highly unlikely he would have survived. He had also suffered from a perforated stomach ulcer and was therefore dangerously ill."

The distance from land of the second rescue added an extra dimension of risk for the rescuers as it was beyond the communication range of their Sea King helicopter.

"Due to their skilful performance however, and with assistance from the 1312 Flight's VC-10 which supported them with communications and by guiding them to the trawler's location, the fisherman was swiftly evacuated to Stanley hospital and he is now expected to make a full recovery."

Sacked employee assaults former boss

A FORMER employee at Fitzroy Farm was given a second conditional discharge after admitting that he assaulted his former boss

On Wednesday morning Ros Cheek prosecuting told the court that Gavin Browning had previously worked at Fitzroy and farm manager Alan Eagle had sacked him on May 17

Mr Browning left the farm to stay in Stanley and returned to Fitzroy to collect his belongings on June 6.

When Mr Eagle became aware of Mr Browning's presence on the farm he went in search of him. He found him drinking in the settlement's Social Club and asked him to leave.

Mr Browning left the club and walked to a friend's house. Mr Eagle followed him. He told Mr Browning he did not trust him and he must leave the farm. Mr Browning retaliated by punching and kicking Mr Eagle.

Defence lawyer Richard Marlor said it was apparent the two men did not get on and Mr Browning had legitimately gone to Fitzroy to collect his belongings. He said that following a series of arguments. Mr Eagle had told Mr Browning he would not be allowed on the farm to attend the Fitzroy Memorial Service which had caused Mr Browning to become emotional and kick out at him.

Mr Marlor said his client admitted kicking Mr Eagle however he denied throwing the punch.

A witness in a written statement said. "Mr Browning had been through a difficult time losing his home and job and thought Mr Eagle got some joy out of it."

The court heard that Mr Browning is unemployed with no savings and so would not be able to pay a fine.

In issuing Mr Browning with a conditional discharge, Justice of the Peace (JP) Judy Summers said Mr Browning's other conditional discharge was for a vehicular offence and as JP's, the bench was not permitted to take it into account.

She said if the defendant appeared in court before a magistrate during the period of his discharge both offences would be taken into account.

Truck driver fined after reversing into van

A MAN from Mount Pleasant was fined after pleading guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention.


The court heard that the power failed on an eleven metre long dumper driven by Kevin Thijs on the Mare Harbour Road.

He decided to reverse back into a side road so as not to block the main carriageway.

Another driver in a van behind the dumper saw him coming and, unable to reverse quickly enough himself, sounded his horn.

The defendant said he hadn't heard the horn because his own reversing alarm was so loud, and the van had been in his blind spot.

Mr Thijs was fined £50 for the offence but was not required to pay costs. FIBS

Q NOW that the holiday credit scheme has been reduced from £1 to 50p per day for the permanent residents of the Falklands, will the fares that are paid every year for contract workers and their families be discontinued or will contracts at least be rewritten to take the reduced budget into account?

A Councillor John Birmingham responded, "There are no plans to either change existing contracts with professionals recruited overseas or to reduce the level of remuneration for future contracted staff. To do so would have the effect of making recruitment of medical and other professionals very difficult in an extremely competitive market."

Air links: get real Bielsa

The following is an open letter to Argentine Foreign Minister Rafael Bielsa

WHICH will be the next Argentine airline to get your authorisation to fly to the Falkland Islands?

You miss the point, there is only one authority that can license an airline to fly here - it is the Falkland Islands Government's Department of Civil Aviation. If you wish you can apply to London a thousand times. They will tell you to contact Stanley.

Be real; will you or any Argentine airline apply to the legally authorised authority, the Falkland Islands Government? Of course not as this would be recognising our existence as a self governing territory.

This, you and I know, you will never do, as you want to colonise us, you want us as your colony with your government in charge. Mr Bielsa, I think you will find that this would be against the principles of the United Nations Decolonisation Committee.

Most Argentine airlines do not meet the standards of safety required by our authorities. Also what Argentine airline would be prepared to ask the British Forces for airport landing permits and agree to their insurance and safety standards? What Argentine would agree to recognise Falkland Islands Government Air Traffic Control or Immigration and Customs and contract with local companies for ground handling, security, agency, etc?

Let's forget fantasy and live in the real world - it will never happen.

I know you will not drop your claim to my home, you must also know we will never accept it - you said you would wait 400 years, never in 400,000 years Mr Bielsa would we accept.

Clarification of cuts was sought Our students are 'overseas' pupils

MRS COLE states, in her letter (PN 11/6/04) that had we asked. we would have been given clarification on cuts to students' grants. I asked. Not only did I ring the Education office to ascertain clarification but rang a councillor responsible for Education, and the Treasury

The Councillor did not know the answer to my query but 'thought' the cuts would not apply to students presently in higher education. The councillor directed me to the Treasury where, at first, they seemed happy to accept the query but, after some minutes. asked if they could get back to me after the weekend.

On to the Education Office. The Director was not in but her assistant told me she 'thought' the cuts would apply to present and future students, as of July. At this point I began to seriously doubt that the left hand knew what the right hand was doing, a doubt strengthened when a letter arrived from the Councillors' office stating that the matter would be discussed at General Purposes Committee on June 23!

If Mrs Cole's figures are correct, she wrote that 'a careful (British) student', after a three-year course, could lace a student debt

of £24,000, and if my figures are correct, then that careful student has spent £.8000 a year, which is what Falklands students presently receive....until July.

Most Falkland Islands parents. like ourselves, already supplement their children's grants, to make their 'frugal' existence less so - our

Quite frankly, I am not particularly interested in the plight of British students. At least they make their decisions aware of their financial circumstances. My concern is for the students in this community who have worked hard to achieve their goals, in the belief that this community would do its utmost to support them in that endeavour. Of particular concern: as of this date, students already in higher education, have not been formally informed that their July grant will be 121/2% less.

I can almost hear the future squeals if any member of the Civil Service opened July's pay cheque and found a shortfall of 121/2%, particularly from those already financially committed to a budget based on the salary to which they assumed they were entitled.

WHILE I am indebted to Mrs Cole for clarification as to whom exactly the cuts in student grants will apply (PN 11/6), I am somewhat saddened to find that she defends this action in terms which smack of a return to the kind of paternalistic and colonialist attitudes from which the Falklands once suffered.

An inevitable consequence of the amount of time we spend proclaiming our pride in being British is, I suppose, that it is easy for the differences between ourselves and those other distant islands to be obscured. Now and again, however, it becomes necessary to point out that however strong the ties are that bind us to Britain, in fact we do not live there.

Our students in Britain are there as overseas students and while the experience of students domiciled in Britain may be of interest. it isn't necessarily relevant. (For our students, for example, seasonal differences as much as the distance from home and the expense of getting there, make working in the vacations infinitely more difficult than for British students, who can go home and live free while working. Given that many universities turn into conference centres during the long vacations, even staying in halls of residence or university flats during vacations may not be an option for the overseas student during vacations.)

But this is beside the main point, which is that we live in a country, which for nearly twenty years has been rich enough to provide its citizens with a level of services and amenities, which previously would have been unimaginable. We are fortunate and we should be proud that we have been able to offer opportunities to all our young people, which were denied to the majority of their parents. However, we do not necessarily have to be grateful.

As I am sure Councillors Summers and Edwards are emphasising in New York, the Falkland Islands is no longer a colony, not a dependent territory, and certainly not some inexplicably distant British local authority.

For some years now we have been autonomous and financially independent with regard to our internal affairs. This means that our government can decide what our priorities are when it comes to spending what is not alms from some distant government, but our own money.

Like many older Penguin News readers. I remember the time when the Falklands did have to rely on a British goose, which was certainly not golden, but laid its eggs sparingly and then only where it chose. I also remember a time when it was considered politically correct for certain people - usually those who had themselves had the benefit of an overseas education - to proclaim publicly that educating Falkland Islanders was a waste of money and would only result in the depopula-tion of the Camp.

Thank goodness that our treatment of our young people today is different and spits in the face of such reactionary attitudes. Let's not take even one step back in that depressing and humiliating direction. If our students are rich, which I still contest, we should rejoice in

Should the present defection by the squid prove to be more than a blip, then of course we shall need to cut costs. Increased localization of senior positions in the administration and the private sector has to be an obvious part of any medium to long-term belt-tightening process, but to be achieved it will require a flow of experienced, qualified and educated Islanders.

It would be foolish to allow this flow to be threatened by further short-term, punitive and essentially petty reductions, particularly if, as in this case, they are to be imposed without consultation with those whom they most effect.



The day's official commemorations were rounded off with a civic reception in the Town Hall, attended by both civilian and military members of the community.











Infections that can affect pregnancy

SOME common infections can affect pregnancy

Salmonellosis is a food-borne infection caused by the bacteria Salmonella.

Symptoms include diarrhoea. fever and abdominal cramps, which can be severe in pregnant women.

Occasionally a pregnant woman passes the infection to her baby, who can develop diarrhoea, fever and, rarely, meningitis.

You can help prevent Salmonella infection by:

. Cooking all meats, poultry and seafood thoroughly

·Avoiding sushi made with raw

·Washing raw vegetables before cooking

· Avoiding unpasteurized milk and foods made from it

·Avoiding soft cheeses such as Brie, Feta, Camembert, blue-veined and Mexican-style (Hard cheeses. processed cheeses, cream cheese and cottage cheese are safe.)

•Avoiding raw or undercooked

Avoiding alfalfa sprouts

Listeriosis is a form of food poisoning caused by bacteria called Listeria monocytogenes.

If a pregnant woman has listeriosis, she may have a miscarriage or stillbirth, or her baby may become very ill or even die.

The recommendation is that all pregnant women take steps to protect themselves and their babies from listeriosis. You should:

·Cook all meats, poultry and seafood thoroughly.

· Avoid sushi made with raw fish.

· Avoid cold cuts or deli meats.

·Wash raw vegetables before cooking

Ingredients

2 tbsp butter

3 tbsp horseradish

2 tbsp sour cream

1 tsp dijon mustard

1 salt and pepper

I tsp white wine vinegar

2 tbsp flour

I cup milk

I tsp sugar

 Avoid unpasteurized milk and foods made from it.

 Avoid soft cheeses such as Brie, Feta, Camembert, blue-veined and Mexican-style. (Hard cheeses, processed cheeses, cream cheese and cottage cheese are safe.)

·Cook leftover foods or readyto-eat foods (like hot dogs) until steaming hot. Cook hot dogs to an internal temperature of at least 165°F

Cytomegalovirus (CMV) is a common viral infection most often seen in young children.

It usually is harmless and does not cause symptoms. When a pregnant woman becomes infected, however, she can pass the virus to her baby. This can lead to serious illness. lasting disabilities or death

You can help prevent CMV infection by doing the following:

·Wash your hands often, especially if you are around young children (1 to 3 years).

·Carefully throw away diapers, tissues and other contaminated items.

 Avoid sharing drinking glasses and utensils with young children as well.

Health care workers, child care providers and others who are around large numbers of young children on a regular basis may want to be tested to see if they have had CMV before they get pregnant.

If a woman has already been infected, she has little to worry about during pregnancy. Routine screening for women at low risk of infection is not recommended.

Group B streptococcus (GBS) infection is a common bacterial infection that is generally not serious

in adults but can be life-threatening to newborns.

GBS affects about 1 in every 2.000 babies born in the United States. Anyone can carry GBS, and between 10 and 30 percent of pregnant women carry it.

You can be tested or screened for GBS infection during the last few weeks of pregnancy. If you carry GBS. or your provider determines you are at risk for GBS infection, you will be treated with intravenous antibiotics during labour and deliv-

Women who have had a urinary tract infection due to GBS or who have had a previous haby with a GBS infection are routinely given antibiotics during labour and delivery.

Toxoplasmosis is a common infection that, when contracted by a pregnant woman, can pose serious risks to her unborn baby. An estimated 400-1,000 babies in the United States are born with toxoplasmosis each year.

Toxoplasmosis in pregnancy can also cause miscarriage and stillbirth. What you can do:

There are simple steps you can take to avoid toxoplasmosis infec-

•Don't empty a cat's litter box. Have someone else do this for you.

•Don't feed your cat raw or undercooked meat.

•Keep your cat indoors, if possi-

.Don't cat raw or undercooked meat, especially pork or lamb.

·Wash your hands immediately after touching raw meat.

•Wash all uncooked fruits and vegetables thoroughly before eating them

·Wear gloves while gardening.

· Avoid children's sand pits. Cats may use them as litter boxes.

Wool report - week ending June 11

AUSTRALIAN and New Zealand wool markets were reported firm once again. In Sydney Australia, in an encouraging sign, spectators have witnessed the wool price indicator close higher over each of the last 5 trading days.

Strong buying activity from China as well as key European topmakers drove the market higher. Worthy of particular note were the gains in the mid micron fleece wool categories which saw increases of the order of 8 pence per kilogram clean (for 22 and 23 micron lots) over the two days of selling

Fine skirtings were reported up by 4 to 8 pence per kilogram clean in Australia, while locks and crutchings were also reported up by a few pence per kilogram clean.

World Markets

The Australian offering for the week totaled 39.056 bales. 90.3% of the bales presented for sale actually "changed hands" with the remaining 9.7% passed-in. Included in the offering were 3.966 bales of crossbred wool of which 3.518 bales were sold. (11.3% passed-in). In New Zealand 85% of the 9.752 bales presented to the trade were sold.

IT WAS an early start on Saturday for eight cub scouts, five scouts and leaders Paul Freer and myself.

Transport kindly provided by Jan Miller. Pam Freer and Len McGill departed from the Capstan car park at 7.25am.

As we neared Mare Harbour and came into sight of the ships the boys' excitement increased.

Cleared by Port Ops we were on board HMS Cardiff at 8.30am and then taken to the wardroom for a can of drink or coffee and to meet our hosts for the day, the officers and crew.

HMS Cardiff is a type 42 destroyer and served in the Falklands during the 1982 conflict.

While we waited for the other guests to arrive from MPA before we could do our safety brief, we were told of the day's plans before going up to the bridge deck to watch the ship leaving the dock and then following HMS Leeds Castle out into the channel.

The boys watched while one officer took bearings off landmarks and marker buoys calling them through to the bridge where course changes were given to the helmsman. As the channel deepened and widened we felt a shudder from below our feet as the Rolls Royce Olympus gas turbines (the same as the engines that power Concorde) kicked in and we picked up speed.

The weather was perfect with very little wind and clear sunshine so it was not cold on deck.

Once out in the sound the two ships manoeuvred around each other and we overtook HMS Leeds Castle Then the real excitement started, "aircraft bearing Red 095, 8 milesinbound." Yes, we were under attack by a Tornado aircraft.

For the next forty-five minutes the boys were thrilled as the ship manocuvred at speed and the defence systems tracked the aircraft which approached from different angles each time and often very low. It's amazing how quick and sharp a 4,000 ton destroyer can spin around to make itself a difficult target, all the time the lookouts constantly updat-

ing the aircraft's course and distance to the weapons controller.

HMS Leeds Castle was turning around us just as tightly, as she dodged attacks and tracked the aircraft with her guns.

In the words of one of the cubs.

With appetites well worked up and no seasickness it was down to the wardroom for lunch: sausages, chips and beans for the boys and curry for the adults. We also met the wardroom's mascot, an elephant who stands about two feet high on the bar and is the temporary home for lost bits of kit: at the time he was wearing a pair of eardefenders. Cubs and scouts soon learned the wardroom rule of no caps on, or you buy a round of drinks.

The supply of food was endless but eventually all were full. Then we split into two groups, each with an officer and a sailor to tour the ship.

We saw and had explained to us how the ship is laid out with a series of numbered watertight sections and how all fire hoses and positions are marked and the area each one can reach in an emergency. We saw the dimly lit operations room where the ship is controlled from when in battle; the engine machinery control room and the helicopter hangar and deck; the small calibre anti aircraft cannons, the phalynx anti missile gun, and noted best of all the Sea Dart missile launcher and magazine where at the

touch of a button the large missiles shoot up the rails onto the launcher.

By now Cape Pembroke was in sight and we were joined by the ship's Lynx helicopters; it must have made a fine sight as the two warships steamed up Port William in the sunset.

We tied up to the mooring and watched a video in the wardroom until the FIC launch came and took thirteen well satisfied, high, youngsters back to Stanley and their homes' some were shouting their stories to parents before we actually got alongside the public jetty.

One lad had mislaid his cap andthis was rescued on Sunday evening and yes, the elephant had taken good care of it.

A very big thank you to Major Marc Brennan for organising the trip and to all on *HMS Cardiff* for a great day, especially to the two Lieutenants who were in charge of us for the day and answered so many questions.

The following day the Cub Scouts made their annual hike up Tumbledown Mountain and renewed their remembrance cross to those who died in the battle.

On Monday a full turnout of smartly uniformed boys were at the Cathedral Service and the Liberation Monument, Well done lads.

More Latin Americans emmigrating to Europe | Peat potential

POVERTY in their home countries and higher obstacles to entering the United States are pushing ever-greater numbers of Latin Americans to immigrate to Europe, from where they send home increasing sums of money now vital to national economies, the International Organization for Migration (IOM) said in a study published on Tuesday

Spain is the main European des-

tination for Latin Americans, whose numbers in the Iberian nation have increased since 1995 - from 92.642 to 514,485 last year - and that fig-ure covers only those who are there legally.

The IOM study showed that 390,000 Ecuadorians were listed in Spanish municipal registries in 2003. while the Interior Ministry noted that only 174,000 Ecuadorians had legal residence in Spain. Immigrants in Spain are encouraged to register with local authorities, even if they are not legal, to gain access to services like free health care

Italy and Portugal have also received a larger number of Latin American immigrants in recent years, while Britain has seen an increase in the number of Caribbean newcomers. According to information from the Italian Interior Ministry. Peruvians constitute the largest South American contingent in that European country, followed by Brazil. Latin Americans represent only 8% of all of Italy's foreignborn residents

The IOM notes that more than half of Latin American emigrants are women, eagerly sought after in Europe to work as domestics, nannies. caretakers for the elderly and in the hotel industry. Latin Americans represent 31% of Spain's total immigrant population. The country's largest expatriate community is from Morocco, followed by Ecuadorians and Colombians. Citizens from those two Andean nations have surpassed the number of Britons, who for a long time made up the second-largest group of foreign residents
Between 1996 and 2003. Ecua-

dorians and Colombians were the fastest-growing immigrant groups. while the number of Argentines has doubled in the last three years as a result of that country's devastating

economic slump
Each year. Latin American expats in Spain send more than a billion dollars back to their homelands, equalling the amount wired home by South Americans in the rest of Europe, the study revealed. According to the IOM, the average size of individual remittances from the European Union to Latin America surpasses that of those coming from the United States, although the cumulative total from that country is much greater because its South American immigrant community is so much larger than Europe's

The United States is the source

of \$30 billion of the estimated \$38 billion in remittances sent home to Latin America and the Caribbean each year.

Latin and Caribbean nations also receive \$2.5 billion in remittances from Japan and \$1 billion from Canada, while another \$1.5 billion is wired between countries within the region.

A study showed that the three largest Latin American immigrant communities in Spain - Colombians. Ecuadorians and Dominicans - send home big chunks of their take-home pay and more than 90% send money to their families

On average, each immigrant sends between seven and ten remittances a year of about 370 euros (\$449) each. Dominicans tend to send about 595 euros (\$722) at a time, compared with 322 euros (\$391) for Colombians

The same study pointed out that Latin Americans in the United States generally send home between \$100 and \$300 a month.

Research suggests that an emigrant who expects to return home in the short term will usually send more money to his homeland.

On the other hand, if he or she plans to remain abroad permanently. economic ties with a now-distant family tend to decrease as savings go toward investments that facilitate integration into the migrant's

A SURVEY on the potential and possible commercial deposits of peat in the Magallanes Region. Tierra del Fuego and adjoining islands was contracted by the Minerals Department of the regional government in extreme south of

Apparently the company began working last January and is expected to deliver a first report next February

The field work, analyzing depth and quality of the peat deposits, is complemented with air and satellite photography

The February report should give an idea of the areas with peat. estimated volume of deposits and the type of peat

According to the Punta Arenas press, contractors have already covered 60 to 70% of the areas marked for surveying including Navarino, Dawson and Riesco Islands, and the Brunswick penin-

Three of the options being considered for the potential peat deposits in the area are agriculture. industry. (particularly cosmetics)

Apparently Tierra del Fuego peat was once very popular for gar-

European funding bid progresses: agreement signed

A MAJOR step towards securing funding for the Falklands from the 09th European Development Fund has been completed with the signing in Brussels of an agreement between the Falkland Islands Governme and the European Commission. Government

The agreement concludes a lengthy process of consultation between the European Commission, Falkland Islands Government and the United Kingdom, which began in April 2003 with the first draft of a programming document.

External Development Officer Jenny Smith said this Single Programming Document details a work programme that will be supported through the FIG budget by the 3 mil-

lion Euro (approximately £2 million) that the fund will provide.

The main objective of the programme is to accelerate sustainable economic growth by supporting private sector development in trade. This is to be achieved by specific trade development initiatives in the maritime, tourism and agricultural sectors

Before the Falkland Islands actually receives the funds there is one more step in the process that needs to be completed.

Ms Smith explained, "This involves the Commission drafting a Financing Agreement putting in place the timetable for disbursing the funds and the reporting system that

the Commission uses to monitor the way the funds are used by the Falkland Islands Government."

This level of funding is possible due to the Overseas Countries and Territories Agreement signed in 2001 that sets out the relationship between the European Community and overseas territories of Member

Ms Smith commented, "With the expansion of the Community this year the Agreement is increasingly important as a mechanism to make sure small Overseas Territories maintain access to European markets and also to development funding

More problems for World Discoverer

A CRUISE ship which regularly visited the South Atlantic for over thirty years, but has experienced a number of difficulties in recent years, has been repossessed.

In a message to clients, the website of Society Expeditions, owners of the World Discoverer, this week stated, "Although we have experienced a steady increase in bookings for our upcoming Antarctica and 2005 voyages, the general problematic situation in the travel industry has led to below budget numbers on this year's summer and fall voyages.

These unusually low numbers have led to financial shortages, and we regret to inform you that our mortgage holders have unexpectedly taken possession of the World Discoverer.

Responding to the news, Councillor John Birmingham, holder of the tourism portfolio, commented, 'It's unfortunate and will hit some of the smaller islands especially."

Councillors meet Bielsa

TWO Falklands councillors have had a brief personal exchange with the Argentine Foreign Minister in New York.

Councillors Roger Edwards and Mike Summers were approached by Rafael Bielsa after presenting their speeches to the United Nations Decolonisation Committee (C24)

Councillor Edwards said Mr Bielsa, "...wished us well and said he would see us next year."

Mr Edwards gave Mr Bielsa a little food for thought: "I suggested when they put forward their argument next time, they include the wishes of Islanders and a little about the right to determine their own future.

"I said he should raise it in their next cabinet meeting - of course they haven't had a cabinet meeting since Kirchner's government took office. He just gave me one of those looks."

New oil exploration company for Falklands drilling

DEVELOPMENTS in the Falklands offshore future have attracted the attention of the British press

Earlier this week Falkland Islands Holdings (FIH) announced its intention to form a new oil exploration company, Falkland Oil and Gas Ltd (FOGL), to survey areas to the south and east of the islands.

The formation is in conjunction with FIH's joint venture partners Global Petroleum Ltd and Hardman Resources Ltd, with financial agreement from RAB Capital. FOGL will own 77.5% of the li-

cences with the remaining 22.5% to be held by Hardman. The shareholdings in FOGL will be RAB 45.4%, FIC 28.9% and Global 25.7%

The Financial Times says the new company, together with Hardman Resources, will invest £2.5 million, "...to fund further work on initial seismic work that suggests reserves of between 200 million and 2.5 billion barrels of oil off Falklands shores.

In an article entitled "Falkland Oil-lands" The Sun reports that news

of the exploration sent shares in FIH up 6.5p to 287.5p.
Director of Minerals and Agri-

culture Phyl Rendell yesterday described the formation of the new

company as "very encouraging."
She added, "The new company structure brings investment to fund further exploration work in the South Falkland Basin which is good for the Islands economy.

Mrs Rendell confirmed oil was brought to the surface during exploratory drilling in 1998. She said, "I have a sample in my office."

Murder on St Helena

TWO men have been charged with the murder of a man whose body was discovered in the moat at Jamestown, St Helena.

Jeremy Thomas (17) and Colin Philips (18) have been jointly charged with the murder of Ryan Thomas (19).

Police investigations continue. The St Helena Herald reports that forensic evidence may be sent to the UK for examination or a forensic expert may be brought to the island.

IT'S HARD to believe that another June has almost been and gone - I remain convinced that Falklands time passes at least twice as quickly as that of the rest of the world.

Once again we've celebrated Liberation Day, dashed into Surf Bay for the midwinter swim and the youngsters have done their annual dressing up thing at the Jelly Tot's party; hundreds of Islanders and general fans of the Falklands have gathered at Lincoln's Inn for the annual reception while, a few thousand miles away, two councillors have taken to the podium at the United Nations C24.

One could be forgiven for a very real sense of déjà vu, however this year, there's one big difference - the message coming from the Falklands with regards to Argentina seems to have an even deeper level of feeling

this year.

In London Sukey Cameron reminded British politicians of Argentina's harassment over recent months and was very clear that this can only serve

to strengthen our resolve to determine our own future.

Councillors Summer and Edwards urged the C24 against adopting its usual resolution and, although they were unsuccessful, their strong message of 'let us decide our own future' was hopefully heeded by their audience.

My own reaction after reading the respective speeches was of hope hope that finally the message might get through.

But in disappointing reality, the words head, banging and brick wall are probably more precise.

This was brought home to me during an interview with two Argentine

veterans last week.

While listening to their moving accounts of 1982 and their heartfelt wish that the sovereignty dispute be solved by peaceful means, I was saddened and frustrated to hear them say, albeit somewhat apologetically,

that they still firmly believe the Falklands are Argentine.

(Before the interview I had secretly hoped that after meeting Islanders the views on sovereignty previously held by the two men might have swung in our favour, however in actuality I believe that in their week here they met very few Islanders - whether that was their fault or ours, I don't know - so it was an empty hope.)

After hearing this 'you belong to us' sentiment, even when they've

seen the place for themselves, I became somewhat despondent.

How we will ever be rid of the cloud of the sovereignty claim when even those who have seen the Falklands, in all their British glory, first hand remain convinced we should be Argentine?



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News from the public meeting

Passengers 'won't notice' £5 levy rise

WILL the increased passenger levy discourage tourists from landing in the Falklands?

This question was put to councillors at the public meeting.

Councillor Jan Cheek said passengers who pay between £2,500 and £30,000 for a cruise, "...aren't going to notice £5 extra when they pay five dollars for a drink on board." She added that security is essential and asked, if the government were not to raise the levy to pay for this, where the meeting would want to see the funds come from.

Councillor Birmingham said the cruise industry received warning of

the increased levy twelve months ago and some people in the tourism industry who objected to the rise were crying "crocodile tears".

One member of the public asked councillors why the government, like some "opposition ports", could not absorb the cost of the new security facilities, however the Chief Executive said the cost is too high and will exceed the funds raised by the levy.

Councillor John Birmingham said the new security would be up and running in time for the beginning of the next tourist season, November 2004.

Luxton: Don't rush out to buy seatbelts

COUNCILLORS have made a mistake over the new seatbelt law and they are warning drivers not to rush out to buy new seatbelts for their vehicles.

Councillor Richard Cockwell said, "we've made a mistake and we'll sort it out."

Councillor Stephen Luxton said it is clear there is confusion over how the new law relates to vehicles without the correct seatbelts and he advised against "throwing money" at the problem. Of particular concern are inward facing bench seats in Land Rovers. Only lap belts can be fitted to these seats however the law states that children under the age of twelve may not use this type of belt.

A six month amnesty is in place for vehicles that do not meet the criteria laid down in the law and Councillor Luxton said he and his colleagues plan to come up with a solution.

'Maintaining employment and investment'

A PRESENTATION on the government's spending, historic budget trends and the Islands' future economic prospects was given to Tuesday evening's public meeting in the Council Chamber.

Chief Executive Chris Simpkins and Deputy Financial Secretary Keith Padgett gave a presentation on how the government plans to cope with the budget deficit of £9.5 million.

Mr Simpkins told the meeting the government is keen to maintain

employment and investment in the future, move to 'user pays' principles, avoid panic, continue investment in the private sector and to reduce the size of the government workforce through "natural wastage".

Mr Simpkins said a loss of the illex fishery in future years could be managed, however this could mean the public's expectations of government services would have to reduce.

High legal costs of restructure will be recovered

THE government will incur "significant" legal fees in the restructuring of its partnership with Stanley Services Ltd, however the cost will be recovered from the sale of shares in the company.

The Chief Executive confirmed the government was facing legal fees of approximately £190,000 in securing the restructuring of Stanley Services Ltd. He said that as a result of the restructuring the government's share will be reduced and shares will be offered to the public for purchase.

He assured the public meeting that the cost of the legal fees will be "hugely exceeded" by the revenue from the sale of shares.

New regulations for collecting penguin eggs

NEW regulations for the collection of penguin eggs have been approved by the Environment Committee

As from now, no egging licences will be issued without the prior agreement of the landowner, who will also receive copies of licences issued.

No egging licences will be issued for sites at Walker Creek, Port King or Bull Point, and North Arm residents will be given first option at the start of the season on licences for Bull Rhodes. Guidance will also be given to licence holders on egg collecting. FIBS

Hague key to sovereignty dispute?

AN ARGENTINE international law professor who supports President Kirchner's offensive policy towards the Falklands such as the specific "sovereignty claim actions of the icebreaker Almirante Irizar, in the maritime space of the Falklands, and refusing concession in practical issues such as charter flights, says the International Court of the Hague is the "only alternative" capable of introducing new dynamics to the Falklands dispute.

Marcel Kohen says a recent ruling in the International Court of the Hague involving self determination and territorial claims in a border area between Nigeria and Cameroon was favourable to the country with territorial claims.

Mr Kohen underlines that the International Court ruling is favourable to Argentina's position dismissing self determination for Islanders in the UN General Assembly, the Decolonisation Committee. C24 and the Organization of American States, OAS, annual dec-

Mr Kohen said in the event of a jurisdictional solution, "...it will force Islanders to abandon their attitude which consists of ignoring Argentine claims.

"Time is running against Argentina because the British have possession of the territory, however, leaving the issue to future generations, besides being irresponsible is equivalent to admitting failure and the lack of new ideas or cour-

Professor Kohen praises Argentina's diplomatic attempts to recover sovereignty over the Falklands, but says they are "insufficient," and "non conductive."

Councillors take on Argentina at C24

FALKLANDS councillors addressing the United Nations Decolonisation Committee, C24, have emphasised Islanders' right to self-determination and argued that Argentina's sovereignty negotiations claim means, "...asking us to change from an Overseas Territory of the United Kingdom to a prize colony of Argentina."

Councillor Roger Edwards underlined that, "... without exception Falkland Islanders do not wish to see a change of British sovereign status," adding, "... we stand before the Committee to ask that we be granted a basic right that is enshrined in the very charter of the United Nations, a right that is recognised by the United Nations in every non self governing territory other than the Falkland Islands, self determination."

Highlighting Islanders' wishes to live in peace with their neighbours he said, "...it would be nice if the present Argentine government could at least recognise that the Falkland Islands governs itself with its own locally elected members." Mr Edwards said that to date the present Argentine government refuses to admit its existence and chooses only to converse through

the British government, "...hardly conductive to furthering stable political progress between our two countries. I would suggest."

Councillor Mike Summers described how the Falklands has evolved into a self governed, prosperous, confident people "... through the freely expressed democratic rights of Islanders to choose their own political destiny, the right to self determination," and was adamant towards Argentina's sovereignty claims."

"There can be and will be no negotiations on sovereignty, because negotiation implies a willingness to change or to concede which among Falkland Islanders does not exist. A resolution therefore which calls for a negotiated solution to the Falklands/Malvinas question has no place in this Committee, since the inhabitants of the Falkland Islands have no wish of it." stressed Councillor Summers.

"For several decades the Falkland Islands Government has largely run its own affairs through democratically elected Government. We have a modern constitution, with full protection for the rights and freedom of individuals, though there will be further amendments in due course, to ensure that we continue to have first rate and effective political institutions, a clearly independent judiciary, an efficient public service, and that the concept of internal self-government is defined and protected."

Councillor Summers also pointed out that "...though we guard closely our right to run our own affairs through our elected representatives, within the spirit of the partnership between the United Kingdom and the Falkland Islands, there is no movement in the Falkland Islands for independence, nor for a change in political allegiance."

The C24 was also addressed by Rafael Bielsa, Minister of Foreign Affairs of Argentina, who recalled that British forces had expelled the Argentine inhabitants and authorities of the Falklands on January 3, 1883, thereby establishing their illegal occupation of the Islands.

He said that since continental Argentinians had been prevented from settling on the islands since their expulsion in 1883, granting the islands' inhabitants the right to self-determination would allow the colonial power to justify its usurpation of territory.

Mr Bielsa further stressed that

the people of Argentina remained fully committed to the peaceful settlement of the dispute and urged the Committee to continue to support the prompt resumption of negotiations on sovereignty.

Also speaking for Argentina was Alejandro Betts, a former resident of the Falklands, who said that although the United Kingdom had been in possession of the Falklands since their "invasion" of the islands in the nineteenth century, it was a legal fact that possession alone did not give legitimacy.

He said the Committee must work to help the United Kingdom to put aside its opposition to negotiation on the status of the Islands, stressing that Argentina's claim to have her legitimate sovereign rights recognised fell within international law.

As expected the Special Committee on Decolonisation adopted without a vote a draft resolution requesting the governments of Argentina and the United Kingdom, "...to resume as soon as possible a peaceful solution to the sovereignty dispute over the Falkland Islands."


Q IF IT is considered unsafe or indeed dangerous for a child to be restrained within a vehicle by a lap strap why is it when you travel by aircraft that the majority of restraints are lap straps for all?

A Our thanks to the Attorney General, Mr David Lang, for answering this week's questions.

Falkland Islands law (which reflects the relevant UK law in this respect) states that lap belts are suitable for adults. It permits large children to wear an adult belt (including a lap belt). A large child is defined as a child of 12 years of age or more or 1.50 metres in height or more. I do not know why a lap belt is not regarded as satisfactory for smaller children. I imagine it is because lap belts do not satisfactorily restrain them.

Different considerations apply to aircraft, where lap belts are used. Aircraft passengers are I understand in the event of an expected possible violent landing advised to position their heads over their knees, with their hands clasped round the back of their heads, so as to avoid or mitigate injury. I understand this (but this is really a matter for an aviation expert) to be necessary because lap belts while sufficient to restrain passengers to their seats are not sufficient on their own to prevent injuries to aircraft passengers if the trunks of their bodies are thrown forward over their lap belts.

Q IF IT is law for vehicles built in recent years to be fitted with restraints then why are the majority of new land rovers still being imported without restraints fitted in the back?



Cars (including Landrovers) imported into the Falkland Islands on or after 31 March 1996 are subject to different requirements as to fitting of seat belts depending on what year they were first used (whether in or outside the Falkland Islands). Leaving aside the requirements as to children, "body restraining" seat belts are required to be fitted to the driver's seat and the window front passenger seat of vehicles first used anywhere before 1st April 1981; vehicles first used anywhere on or after 1st April 1981 are to be provided with three point belts for those seats and vehicles first used on or after 1st April 1987 are required to be fitted with seatbelts for all forward facing seats. (not "all seats in the back").

Leaving aside the requirements as to children, there is not any requirement for any any form of seat belt to be fitted to inward facing bench seats.

I understand that a number of vehicles have been imported since 30th March 1996 and are in use in breach of these requirements. I do not know why this is so. It is contrary to the law.

DESPITE traffic problems in London, more than two hundred guests attended the Falkland Islands Government Annual Reception at the Honourable Society of Lincoln's Innlast week

Among the parliamentarians present were the Right Honourable Adam Ingram MP, Minister of State for the Armed Forces, the Right Honourable Michael Ancram MP, Shadow Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and the Right Honourable, the Lord Hurd of Westwell.

The Chilean Ambassador was able to attend for the early part of the evening, and the Uruguayan Ambassador was represented by the Embassy's Consul.

Also in attendance were visiting Islanders (including Councillor Ian Hansen), Falkland Islands students, Foreign and Commonwealth Office and Ministry of Defence personnel, former Governors, Chief Executives and Commanders of British Forces and members of United Kingdombased Falkland Islands groups.

A speech by the Falkland Islands

A speech by the Falkland Islands Government Representative, Sukey Cameron, was well received. She told the gathering, "As many of you know, the current Argentine government has adopted a more assertive policy on Falklands issues, and has deliberately taken measures designed to make life more difficult for Falkland Islanders. They have effectively banned all charter flights between South America and the Islands by refusing permission to overfly Argentine territory.

"They have demanded the introduction of direct flights from Buenos Aires. They have authorised incursions into our fishing zone in order to undermine our fishing indus-

try, at a time when our Illex fishery has had its worst ever year. It is hard to imagine more blatant and unprincipled acts of intimidation.

"Despite these provocations, our councillors have refused to bow to bullying and blackmail and we have had robust support from the UK Government and our friends in Parliament. for which we are very grateful. These actions only reinforce Islanders' commitment to the principle of self-determination. The Argentine Government will discover in time that they are totally counterproductive."

She outlined some of the challenges and difficulties faced by the Falkland Islands in the past twelve months before paying tribute to Harold Rowlands and Adrian Monk.

Ms Cameron's speech was followed by a message from Her Majesty the Queen, read by Sir Rex Hunt, who then proposed the Loyal Toast before a performance of Beating the Retreat by the Band of the Irish Guards provided a perfect close to the evening.

Conscripts return for 'closure'

TWO Argentine veterans of the Falklands war say they have achieved "closure" from a return visit to the Islands.

Jorge Altieri and Jose Rosskio were both nineteen years old when they fought with the 7th Mechanized Regiment in the 1982 battle on Mt Longdon

Mr Altieri was wounded in the battle, losing his left eye. He is also paralysed down one side of his body.

He and Mr Rosskio left the Islands on Saturday, June 19, after a one week visit.

Mr Rosskio said he and his friend, who were both conscripts during the war, were simply, "...ex soldiers who came here to pay our respects to the people who died on Mt Longdon."

He added, "I came back because I needed closure in my life and I'm also doing it for my friends who died here."

The two men lost thirty-six of their comrades in the battle. To commemorate this, they carried a plaque which lists the names of the thirty-six men on to Mt Longdon. Mr Rosskio said, "We didn't want to cause any problems," so, after visiting the mountain, they chose to place the plaque in the cemetery at Darwin.

Asked how they had been received in the Islands, Mr Rosskio said that besides an incident in a Stanley bar. "... we haven't had any problems from anybody." However he added, "...we haven't felt very welcome either."

Mr Altieri said that as a conscript travelling to the Islands in April 1982 he felt proud. He said, "Please don't take this the wrong way. In our opinion we always thought that the Islands, because they are so close to Argentina, belonged to Argentina.

"That is why, when we came here (in 1982) and got the Islands back, we were very proud to get something that belonged to us.

"But this was without knowing the aftermath that comes from war. I was hurt on Mt Longdon. I have paralysis on my right side and I lost my left eye.

"It has to be done in a diplomatic or political way; to decide who the Islands belong to without fighting, without having another war."

Mr Rosskio said, "When we came here aged nineteen years old, we were convinced we were fighting for something that was ours.

"Through the days, when you think about hunger and cold and other things, you realise you're being used by politicians.

"Now that I'm 41 I say that

war is not the (correct) way of doing things."

However he added that he still believes the Falkland Islands belong to Argentina: "I also realise at the age of 41 that the war doesn't take you anywhere and we have to find a way to live in peace - both English and Argentine."

The pair say the return to the Falklands helped them to find closure in their lives. Mr Rosskio said, "I had to have closure in my life in a way that is difficult to explain, and to pay homage to my friends. I feel peace now that I am here for the second time.

"I didn't want to die without coming here again."

Mr Altieri said he felt the same way: "It was very hard for me to have closure because of my disability. It was difficult to go up the mountain.

"But I did it because of my friends who fell there, thinking about their families and also thinking about the families of the British guys who died there.

"Because while they were killing us and we were killing them, their families and ours were hurting in their countries.

ing in their countries.

"This is the way to have closure, pay homage to both sides -

British and Argentine."

He added, "It was very difficult to go back to the mountain, to find our bunkers and remember all the time we were there, wet, with no change of clothes and with very little food."

Mr Rosskio said that during their visit he and his friend met someone who served with the British Forces in 1982: "We became friends with someone who attacked us back then. We had dinner with one of the guys and we were made very welcome."

Mr Altieri added, "We didn't come here to wave any flags or any-

thing.
"We want to have the door open to come back when we can, as we leave our doors open (to people here) to visit us in Buenos Aires."

Dentist Bob talks about his D-Day experiences

A MAN who worked as a dentist in the 1slands in the 1950s has recounted his war memories in an interview published in a Seychelles newspaper.

In a D-Day anniversary article in the Seychelles Nation, dentist Bob Duncan (80) recounts his 1944 experiences. He has lived in the Seychelles for many years.

Bob landed at Normandy two days after D-Day and described his experiences as "terrifying." At the time he was an platoon commander with the Duke of Wellington's regi-

He was evacuated after being shot in the leg however after his recovery he was sent to fight in Malaysia.

A SERVICEMAN from Mount Pleasant has received a medal for his work in Afgahnistan.

Squadron Leader Simon Haseltine, of Whitstable, was awarded the Operational Service Medal for his role in Afghanistan in early 2002.

He was awarded the medal by Air Commodore Richard Lacev in a ceremony at the British Forces South Atlantic Islands Headquarters, where Simon is now based, on 18 June 2004

Simon deployed to Afghanistan as part of the initial detachment of British Forces on 9 January 2002. as the Deputy Chief of Staff for the Royal Air Force ISAF forces. and was based in Kabul.

A military spokesperson said, "He was responsible for the logistical support of the detachment of over 300 RAF and, interestingly. Spanish Air Force personnel, which involved the provision of all weapons and ammunition, technical spares, fuel, clothing, food and, crucially - drinking water.

'As nothing to support the British forces could be purchased locally, Simon organised for everything to be provided from the UK and flown into theatre on the 4,000 mile airbridge everyday, by the fleet of RAF C17 heavy lift transport aircraft and the smaller C-130 Hercules aircraft."

The spokesperson said Simon worked in a hostile environment and under extreme weather conditions. "On his arrival, the night temperatures reached lows of -20C. whilst at the end of May on his departure home, it was a scorching +40C

Simon said the Afghanistan scenery was stunning - a beautiful country with dramatic hills and valleys. Of the Afghan people, he said "They were very friendly and really made the British Forces very welcome.

"They would come up and shake our hands and shout hello as we passed by - they made us feel very welcome indeed

Simon also devoted his limited spare time to a local orphanage based in Kabul city centre

The surrounding homes and shops had all been bombed to ruins during the previous 10 years of conflict that had riddled the country but the orphanage stood as a beacon of humanity

It was funded by a local doctor but Simon was determined to help the orphans who lived there in quite appalling circumstances. Most of the orphans had injuries from the conflict and all slept on a bed of straw in an open, bombed out build-

Simon is now based in the Falkland Islands as Officer Commanding Supply Squadron and is again responsible for the logistical support of the British Forces based on the Islands.

He is here for 13 months and is due to return home in early July 2004. Again, during his off duty moments, Simon has been the local Scout Leader of the 1st Falkland Islands Scout Group, as well as enjoying his passion for horse riding, photography, trekking, sport and penguin spotting

Simon is a Chartered Member of the Institute of Logistics and is posted to RAF High Wycombe in late July, where he will be responsible for logistics strategy within the Royal Air Force.





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

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Everest climb supports Cystic Fibrosis Trust

IT WAS a challenge of Everest proportions but the team of eight firemen from the Royal Air Force Fire Section have smashed the world record to climb 8.848 metres or 29,028 feet on a step machine, the equivalent height of the world's highest mountain.

The previous record was set at two hours six minutes and thirty-four seconds and following intense training, lots of determination and buckets of sweat, the team reached the equivalent summit of Mount Everest in an amazing one hour, fifty-six minutes and eight seconds, knocking a staggering ten minutes and twenty-six seconds off the record.

The challenge took place on Saturday, June 5 in the NAAFI facility at Mount Pleasant and the record attempt was organised to raise some money for the Cystic Fibrosis Trust.

Taking part were Sgt Charlie Boyes. Cpl Richard Saville and SACs Edward Kerry. Steve Wilson, Chris Grimshaw, Kevin Williams. Dan Levy and David Rome.

Cpl Saville said. "It was a tough challenge but we felt if we were going to raise money for charity the way we went about it would have to be worthwhile to encourage people to part with their money for this very good cause."

To ensure that the record at-

tempt accurately applied the rules of the Guinness Book of Records, official adjudicators and time keepers were appointed, professionals from Life Fitness in UK were required to calibrate the step machine used and video, photo and media coverage were collated.

These are now being sent off to the Guinness Book of Records so that the team's success can be recognised officially and the time ratified as the new world record.

The Everest climb was not the first challenge that the RAF Fire Section have completed in aid of their good cause.

The day before the record attempt, a team of 14 cyclists used three exercise bikes to pedal their way around the equivalent distance of the perimeters of both East and West Falklands.

The 638 kms were completed in an impressive five hours and five minutes with some individuals averaging up to 30 miles per hour.

Together, the two events raised a magnificent £1061-17 which was augmented to £2000 by the Mount Pleasant Charities' Fund.

Sergeant Charlie Boyes and Sergeant Steve Wiles, who organised the events said, "we are very pleased with the amount of money we raised as a section. We are very grateful to everyone who donated".

Combating depression and the effects of winter

IT IS well recognised that in climates like the Falklands' our mood may be affected by the level of sunlight we are all exposed to during the winter months.

Most of us are busy throughout the day and if we work indoors, we may never see natural light from breakfast till bedtime.

As we settle into the middle of winter, now is the time to consider what we can do to protect ourselves against depression and combat the effects of winter.

Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD) is caused by a sensitivity to the lack of natural sunlight during the winter season. Sunlight affects the pineal gland in the centre of the brain and this can lead to depression when we are deprived of natural sunlight. A key sign of SAD is excessive sleep with difficulty waking up in the morning.

Even if we do not have SAD, most of us notice a degree in change in our lifestyle and our activities during the winter months.

Be it gardening, walking, organising outings, or socialising when the weather becomes inclement and the evenings are dark we are unable to engage in these activities or may lose the incentive to do so.

Key symptoms of depression: Depressing mood or not

- enjoying life as much.
- Insomnia or sleeping too much
- Decreased appetite or overeating.
- · Lethargy, loss of energy and motivation
 - Poor concentration.

What we can do to help ourselves:

Maximise sunlight - when you get the opportunity to see the sun get out doors or let the daylight in.

Socialise Make the effort to get out and meet people. Many activities are arranged during the winter months from darts and quizzes to dances. Try some of them and delay your judgement until afterwards to decide whether you have enjoyed it.


Exercise Increase your endorphins, the natural stress and depression buster. Try something aerobic which will increase your heart rate like a brisk walk or dancing or you could try swimming or cycling at the leisure centre

Seek advice - if you have noticed a change in your mood talk to your GP about it. Sometimes medication can help. If you are already taking medication for depression. consider carefully before making any alterations to the dose. Ask yourself, does your mood normally dip in the winter period, if so talk to your GP and seek advice about the dose of medication you are tak-

Recipes for the Falkland Islands

Warming low fat puddings for the middle of winter Dark-Chocolate Fudge Pudding Recipe

Ingredients

1/2 cup granulated sugar replacement

- 3 tbsp all-purpose flour
- I tbsp granulated fructose
- dash salt
- I 1/2 cup skimmed milk
- I oz unsweetened baking chocolate in small pieces

1 egg, beaten

1 tbsp margarine 1 tsp vanilla extract

Method

Combine sugar replacement. flour, fructose, and salt in a nonstick sauce pan.

Gradually stir in milk. Blend

Stir in chocolate and egg. Cook over medium heat until mixture thickens, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, and stir in margarine and vanilla. Spoon into six decorative dessert dishes. Serve warm or chill until set.

Apple and Cinnamon Bread Pudding

Ingredients

2 cups skimmed milk

- 3/4 cup maple syrup
- I thsp ground cinnamon 1 cup egg whites (6-8 eggs)
- 4 cup diced bread
- 2 cup apple, peeled, cored and diced

I cup raisins

Preheat the oven to 350F. In a large bowl, combine the milk, maple syrup, and cinnamon.

In another bowl, beat the egg whites until frothy. Add the egg whites to the milk mixture and stir to combine thoroughly.

Add the bread and toss well.

Soak for 30 minutes. Fold in the diced apples and raisins and pour into a nonstick or lightly oiled 8x12x2" baking dish.

Bake for 45-50 minutes, until the top is brown and crisp. Serve warm or at room temperature.



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Wool report - week ending June 18

GENERAL OVERVIEW

During the week June 14, through to June 18, South African, Australian and New Zealand wool markets were reported firm for most micron categories relevant to the Falkland Islands.

However it should be noted that adverse currency movements during the week meant that price increases, when expressed in terms of pence per kilogram clean, were at best, minimal for most fleece wool lots (and in fact were negative for some micron categories). The main exceptions to this generalization were lots between 21 and 23 micron, which increased by up to 5 pence per kilogram clean.

Buying activity was quite widespread with good interest from China as well as European topmakers. Skirtings, crutchings and locks were all reported up during the weeks trading. This applied particularly to finer, low VM skirting types, which increased by 4 to 6 pence per kilogram clean in Australia.

World Markets

The Australian offering for the week totaled 51,115 bales. 89% of the bales presented for sale actually "changed hands" with the remaining 11% passed-in. Included in the offering were 3,846 bales of crossbred wool of which 3,335 bales were sold. (12.2% passed-in). In New

Zealand 82% of the 13,056 bales presented to the trade were sold. while in South Africa, 87% of the 10.450 bales offered were sold.

Chile's prostitutes look forward to an 'exceptional season'

VALPARAISO is not 'Sodom and Gomorra' said Chilean governor Ivan de la Maza, flatly rejecting that the country's main port is about to become a huge "sex market" when aircraft carrier USS Ronald Reagan arrives this weekend.

The Santiago press reported that thousands of prostitutes from all over Chile and even neighbouring countries were converging on Valparaiso looking forward to an "exceptional season" when the thousands of US seamen arrive for a rest and recovery few days.

Mr de la Maza insisted that the whole "sex market" idea regarding the 5,500 crewmembers of the US

Navy carrier which will remain in Valparaiso from Sunday until June "...has been blown out of all pro-

'Sometimes wrong ideas are made up of the people who are coming to visit us, Valparaiso is no Sodom and Gomorra," stressed the Chilean

We've taken all the necessary security measures and we're not going to allow any outbreaks of 'sex marketing in the port-city, said Mr. de la Maza, adding that special, 'tourist attractions" and sightsecing tours have been organised for the US sailors

However health officials from

the port city anticipated that special measures had been taken to prevent the spread of sexually transmitted diseases

Health official Anibal Vivaceta said that several places in Valparaiso. where US seamen were most likely to seek sexual services have been inspected," adding that prevention measures would be reinforced, particularly among risk groups.
According to Chilean Police in-

formation and internet sites offering sexual services, a growing number of prostitutes from neighbouring countries have begun offering their services in Santiago and other cities in recent years.

They come mainly from Ecuador, Colombia, Peru, Argentina, Bolivia and Venezuela with each group operating in different areas.

Valparaiso is believed to be the

haven of Argentine prostitutes. The \$US4.5 billion, USS Ronald Reagan is circumnavigating the South American continent on its way from Norfolk, Virginia to her operational base in San Diego, Califor-

One of the latest carriers to be built, (approx. 90,000 tons displacement) USS Ronald Reagan is one of the largest and most modern units of the US Navy with over 80 aircraft and a crew of 5,500

In search of solutions to the 'jumbo squid invasion'

A FLEET of twenty seven vessels from Talcahuano, in Region VIII, is to begin research this week into jumbo squid, a species local fishermen blame for a negative impact on several fisheries, specially on hake.

The study, authorised by the Undersecretary of Fisheries, to last a month, will be conducted by members of the Institute of Fishing Research (INPESCA), who will extract samples of jumbo squid from the vessels' by-catches.

Besides serving to define their biological features and their impact on other species, the data collected by the experts will assist in determining resource biomass, thus defining whether jumbo squid fishery could

expected abundance of jumbo squid in Chilean waters has caused the distancing of jack mackerel and hake from the fishing grounds, as well as the reduction of sardine and anchoveta stocks

gone one step further and contacted Korean companies who might be interested in purchasing the product.

According to artisinal fishermen. who have only been able to catch 25% per cent of their monthly hake fishing quota, this could be extremely significant, since this could turn their desperate situation into an important source of income, generating employment

The idea has been taken up in Cocholgue, in Region VIII, where they are already looking for jumbo squid buyers


