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BBC weatherman visits Islands

BBC WEATHERMAN Michael Fish left the Islands yesterday after a week long visit

Mr Fish said his visit had been "very hectic" and was very much a "working trip."

Speaking to Penguin News on Tuesday, Mr Fish said that he had mostly been confined to Mount Pleasant due to bad weather, but was planning a trip to Sea Lion Island on Wednesday.

He has been due to visit the Islands for some three years but other commitments have pushed back his trip, which he says is a. "liaison visit."

School children and members of the public were given a talk by Mr Fish at the Community School about meteorology on Tuesday after which he met His Excellency the Governor, Howard Pearce, at Government House.

When asked if anything had surprised him about the Falklands he replied, "Well, not the weather - I knew it was going to snow." He was though, surprised at the size of the Falklands and said he hadn't realised just how far it was from Mount Pleasant to Stanley.

Mr Fish attributes his popularity as a weatherman to the fact that he is, "handsome and modest." adding that most of the fan mail he receives is from people asking for, "autographs, photographs and help with homework."

October will bring retirement from the Meteorological Office for

Mr Fish, who says he hopes to get another job after he retires. He is keen to continue in broadcasting but says that the amount of make up required for doing his television appearances means he could probably do. "adverts for Max Factor."

Despite spending most of his time working at Mount Pleasant since his arrival, Mr Fish did manage a visit to New Haven where he encountered a solitary penguin who clearly wasn't impressed with the visitor's celebrity status, "I think that penguin obviously watches the BBC the way he walked away." Mr Fish joked.

The longest serving meteorologist in the UK, and possibly the world, having been doing the job for, "forty two years man and boy," Mr Fish said he will be "very sad" to leave the service.

News in brief

Fishing licensing

THURSDAY at 4pm was the closing date for applications for licences for the first 2005 fishing season. Director of Fisheries John Barton said yesterday, "A lot of applications tend to come in pretty close to the deadline, so until we reach that point we won't have the full picture."

"We anticipate that applications will be similar to previous years, except for Illex, where there is likely to be some reduction in numbers. We already have more than forty Illex applications and anticipate further applications."

Scallop fishing potential to be further investigated

A PROPOSAL by the Falkland Island Government Fisheries Department to further explore the potential for scallop (ostiones) fishing around the Islands was approved by the Fisheries Committee at their meeting on Tuesday morning.

The proposal put before the Committee was that the scallop fishing vessel F/V Holberg should return to Falklands waters for around thirty days to carry out exploratory fishing in a number of selected areas not currently targeted for scallop fishing.

Director of Fisheries, John Barton, put forward the proposal in a short paper to the Fisheries Committee, which advises the Executive Council of the Falkland Islands and brings together govern-

ment officials, elected members of the Islands' legislature and local private sector representatives of the Islands' fishing industry.

In recent years there has been an exploratory fishery for scallops in the Falkland Islands Conservation Zone (FICZ). The Committee was told that some 920 tonnes (green weight) had been taken in 2003 and 2004. This was the Total Allowable Catch (TAC), which was regarded as the sustainable yield from the known scallop banks, situated mainly to the North-East of Stanley.

While the TAC was sufficient to allow the vessel recently deployed to fish profitably for a matter of months, the Committee was informed that both the company that owned the vessel and the Fisheries Department were interested in determining whether other scallop banks existed, which might make the scallop resource larger. This in turn might lead to an adjustment of the TAC in an upward direction.

Some previous exploratory work, together with reports from other fisheries, had suggested that scallops might be more widely spread around the Falklands, but it remained to be seen whether there were significant concentrations elsewhere, such as those currently being exploited.

The Committee were informed that the intention was that all catches taken during the exploratory fishing process would be returned to the sea, except for scientific samples. This would avoid the need for the vessel to be issued a licence by the Fisheries Department and would ensure the maintenance of the exploratory focus of the voyage. As there would be no need to process the catch, a minimum number of crew would be required, which would reduce the cost of the exercise.

Responding to fears expressed by Mr Drew Irving of Argos Ltd that scallop fishing in certain areas might compromise the breeding of loligo squid, the Director of Fisheries said that this was unlikely, due to the small size of the net deployed, but that the process would in any case be monitored by scientific observers from the Fisheries Department. THE PUBLIC meeting was fairly well attended on Tuesday evening by some standards but even so I feel the need to advertise to those who don't attend these gatherings the entertainment they are missing out on.

In no other situation will you witness your elected councillors in such a vulnerable position. They sit, lined up at a table in the Court and Council chambers faced with some of the most vociferous and in some cases ferocious members of our community. They have no idea what questions are going to be fired at them or whether they will be united in their replies - it's the times when they are not united that are most entertaining. The shuffling of feet and the manly 'harummphs' that are discreetly omitted on occasion leave their attackers in no doubt that they are on to a winner if they are looking for an argument.

One of the councillors has a particularly endearing habit of rapidly tapping his foot and affects a completely blank expression in his eyes when he doesn't agree with, or has little interest in the point being put across - an expression I immediately recognised as that adopted by my daughter whenever we reached the maths stage of radio lessons in her early education. Like my daughter, this councillor is a force to be reckoned with once the shutters come down and the discussion is usually brought to a close following some down to earth, common sense reasoning.

Another uses his quick wit to diffuse arguments and ingratiate himself with members of the public, this is usually quite effective but can have an opposite effect on those who either miss the joke completely or take umbrage at it.

Yet another uses charm and diplomacy at all times, it works for him - and good on him (I could do with some lessons- it wasn't on the curriculum when I attended Stanley School).

I could go onbut the point is they are human and as such have their little idiosyncrasies.

One councillor who visited *Penguin News* earlier this week beat his chest and declared the media are scum - no big deal he always tells us that.

In this instance he meant the treatment dished out to members of the public by the tabloids overseas, in this particular case we agreed that ambulance chasing was not an admirable way to gain a story. Then there is the hounding that politicians take from the media over their tiniest mistakes (or indiscretions normally).

My point is that our councillors are a pretty human, approachable and accessible bunch. If you are not happy with an issue or have a question that needs answering then the public meeting held each month is a good way to bring a subject into the public eye and most likely obtain an answer on the spot.

It doesn't have to be of earth shattering importance, just something you need to know, or something you would be more comfortable with if you understood it better - a good understanding of what is going on in the Islands has to make for a better, happier environment for everyone to live in.

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News from the Public Meeting

Licenced to use what radio bands?

A QUESTION of when the Mount Alice to Mount Kent two metre repeater would be repaired sparked a lively debate on the validity of radio licenses at Tuesday's Public Meeting.

Chairman of the meeting Councillor Roger Edwards said that the breakdown with the repeater was as a result of extreme windy weather. He explained that Mario Zuvic-Bulic of KTV was awaiting the arrival of spares for the system and it would be repaired as soon as possible thereafter.

A member of the public then queried who would be licensed to use the system when it was repaired as he had been told by former Chief Executive, Michael Blanch that there was no amateur band licence in the Falklands. He said that he had assumed anyone could listen to any band. However, he had been reprimanded for listening on the marine band even though he had been able to pass on a distress call and later a Mayday call because he was listening.

The member of the public said that if it was correct that there is no amateur band, farmers would be operating illegally on the repeater site when it is repaired and people have been paying unnecessarily for licences.

Councillors were unsure as to the situation regarding amateur radio licences and assured the public that they would look in to it as soon as possible.

School managers selection process

THE PROCESS used for the selection of School Managers took up a large chunk of the allocated hour for the public meeting.

It was suggested that a different election system would open up the process and get people more interested not only in education matters, but in being on other boards and ultimately standing for Legislative Council.

A member of the public said that the education board had been unable to get people to stand for the positions of school managers for several terms and had on occasion had to 'ring around' to get candidates.

Councillor Summers said the situation of few people putting themselves forward for election was not particular to education but is the same for most elections, adding, "__the same people put themselves forward and are to be found on many boards and committees."

Mr Summers said if a better system were proposed then the present one should be changed, however he added that a change in the system would not necessarily, "...change the degree of apathy that exists in the islands."

The subject is to be put on the agenda at the Education Board Meeting next month.

Councillor Roger Edwards added that there is an open list held at Gilbert House for people to put their names forward if they are at all interested in sitting on committees.

Public Jetty will remain open to the public

IT WAS established that the Public Jetty would be open to the public on days when there are no tourist vessels in port. Restrictions will only be on cruise ship days.

Councillor Roger Edwards said he hoped the building housing the security equipment would be, "...secure enough to protect the contents," from any form of vandalism so that the area would remain open to the public.

Concern was expressed over the suitability of the temporary pontoons used for cruise passengers and the suggestion that they should be better anchored was made.

Councillor Birmingham said 10% of cruise passengers would be screened on return to their ship.

There was some confusion regarding the security level which would be applied to cruise ships visiting the Falkands. Some thought it was the flag state of the ship while others thought it was the level applied to the previous port visited.

Penguin News contacted Acting Port Facility Security Officer Roy Summers on Wednesday who said that the level of security is set by TRANSEC the Transport Security Directorate who are part of the UK Department of Transport. The Falkand Islands were set at Level 1 on July 1, 2004. Mr Summers said the flag state dictates the level of security on the ship and when different to a port, appropriate steps would be taken.

Straw and Bielsa exchange a 'few pleasantries'

COUNCILLOR Summers said the much publicised meeting between British Foreign Minister Jack Straw and his Argentine counterpart Rafael Bielsa was a very small affair with, "...nothing to come of it because nothing happened." He described it as a very brief meeting during which they, "...exchanged a few pleasantries."

Court news

Drink driver receives two year ban

FORMER News Editor with the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station (FIBS) Lee Hazell appeared in the Magistrates Court on Wednesday after a two week adjournment for the preparation of pre-sentence reports.

Miss Hazell had pleaded guilty on September 14 to three charges, drink driving, driving without insurance and taking a vehicle without consent.

The charges related to an incident which occured on September 11 Police received information that Miss Hazell had been drinking in Stanley and was believed to be driving to Surf Bay. A mobile patrol found a Suzuki jeep on its roof in the ditch with Miss Hazell and a passenger still inside.

Further investigation revealed that the jeep was Falkland Islands Government property and was not insured for social use. Miss Hazell provided a sample of breath at the police station resulting in a reading of 72mg of alcohol per 100ml of breath (35mg is the legal limit).

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek told the court that the vehicle in question was in fact, "a write off" and was valued at £1750.

Senior Magistrate Mrs Clare

Faulds, presiding over her first case in the Falklands told the court that she and Justices of the Peace John Fowler and Richard Sawle had read and considered the pre-sentence report and asked Miss Hazell if she had anything to add. Miss Hazell said she was, "... suffering from a bit of depression," and was seeking help for that.

Mrs Faulds said that all three charges were," potentially very serious issues."

She told Miss Hazell that very real consideration had been given to imposing a custodial sentence saying, "because of the impact that would have on your daughter," a probation order of two years will be imposed.

Mrs Faulds said. "This is not a soft option," adding, "...the intention is to help you change your ways."

The probation order holds a condition that Miss Hazell continues her doctor's visits to help with her depression.

For the charge of drink driving. Miss Hazell was disqualified from driving for a period of two years and ordered to pay court costs of 70

Kids Zone: Parental input 'vital'

WORK is progressing on the setting up of a new community child care facility.

A spokesperson for Stanley Kids Zone said input from parents and prospective users of the new facility is vital. "We want to know what factors are most important to you when making child care arrangements, for example cost, location. flexibility, staff levels, snacks available, trained staff, safety, and school transfers, so that we can try to meet your needs."

The organisation was incorporated as a company limited by guarantee on August 31, and registered as a charity on September 1.

The spokesperson said. "Stanley Kids Zone has been established to provide day-care for infants and children in a safe and secure environment on a full-time, part-time, sessional, occasional or emergency basis; to encourage child development and education through stimulating, structured and age appropriate activities; to offer assistance and support to parents, guardians and others with responsibility for the care and welfare of children, and to promote high standards in all areas of child care and child welfare.

"Membership Forms have been prepared, with the membership fee set at £10 covering the period up

to December 31, 2005. Membership is open to any resident who has an interest in the care, welfare and development of infants and children. Members are entitled and encouraged to participate in the development of the company by attending, speaking and voting at all general meetings of the company."

Anyone interested in becoming a member should contact one of the directors or email alison@falklands.info for a membership form and/or copy of the company constitution.

The spokesperson said that initially they are looking to open a daycare facility catering for children of below-school and infant school age, but we are also exploring the possibility of before, after and lunchtime care for junior school pupils, adding, "...the directors are keen to hear from any volunteers interested in helping organise this aspect of childcare"

Significant funds will be required to meet the cost of converting and equipping the building and the directors are keen to hear from any volunteers interested in fundraising or in providing support or practical help in any way.

As a registered charity, any donations of £50 or more made by resident individuals or companies are tax deductible.

Bio security consultants to review imports

TWO consultants from New Zealand will be arriving in the islands this weekend to review Falklands import procedures and issues relating to bio-security.

John Hellstrom and Bruce Simpson will arrive on Saturday for two weeks of meetings to review the procedures in place and make recommendations to the government.

Steve Pointing from the Department of Agriculture said that bio-security is making sure that plant and animal diseases are not brought into the Islands. This can arrive on plant and animal products, clothing, second hand vehicles and equipment.

There are already procedures in place when importing into the Islands, but the consultants will advise how government departments,

mainly the Department of Agriculture, Customs and Immigration and Environmental Planning can work together more efficiently.

Steve says the current system works theoretically, but in practice not as well as it could.

There is concern about introducing non-native species to the Islands that are not already here, to stop pests competing with native species. This has happened in the past, but the aim of these regulations is to prevent it in the future.

During their time here, the consultants will be reviewing imports into Mare Harbour. RAF and LanChile arrivals and the St Brandon calling into Fox Bay and Stanley. FIBS/PN

The prospectus containing the public offer is available for eligible investors to order from the Company's website.



Mrs Faulds is married with three sons, her husband is the Senior Editor of Manx official record (Hansard) and a non-stipendiary clergyman in the Church of England. Mrs Faulds has also chaired several statutory tribunals including Employment Tribunal and Data Protection Appeals Tribunal.

Mrs Faulds said she saw the Senior Magistrate post advertised in the law section of The Times, the breadth and variety of work appealed to her and she became fascinated by the prospect of working in another island community. She said, "I am no lover of city life and have no aspirations to be a specialist in a narrow field of law.'

Mrs Faulds explained that she read up a bit about the Falklands and the more she read the more she wanted to experience it for her-self, adding. "I felt the time had come where I could take a less hands-on role as a mother so, here

New fence not practical

I AM sitting at my desk in the Education Office, Stanley Cottage, reading the Penguin News and writing this letter. (Before all your readers take up their pens, or leap to their telephones to complain, can I say that it's 6.30pm on Friday evening, so I hope they will allow me a bit of recreation)

I have just noticed your editorial. (Vol 16 No22) voting the new fencing around Stanley Cottage the best improvement around

town for many years.

Yes, from outside the fencing does look very neat and presentable and maybe beauty is in the eye of the beholder. The wind is however, howling across the harbour from the north and northwest and the office has no protection at all. I am seriously wondering whether I should move away from the beautiful, if somewhat cracked, stained glass windows because they are taking a massive batter-

For years, the ugly (I admit it), high and substantial corrugated iron fence offered a lot of protection to the office. A number of well established hedging plants and a beautiful, very old, very large honeysuckle offered protection and pri-vacy to Stanley Cottage - all have been removed. There is now a palisaded fence, with lots of gaps.

When a new fence was first proposed I was very pleased. It was agreed that a 'solid' feather-board fence' would be erected on the

Villiers Street side of the garden; this would be higher near the office window to give additional protection and privacy. I understand that this solid fence was opposed by the Historic Buildings Committee and the palisaded fence, all round the plot, was considered to be more in keeping with the house. Well, it may be but - it's low, we can't grow substantial plants up it for protec-tion, it's full of gaps and it doesn't serve its purpose

This is not criticism of the people who erected the fence; after a slow start they appear to have done a good job. It is simply a comment on what I think is a misguided decision to aim at appearances rather

than functionality.

Since I came to the Falkland Islands, I have admired the practical and sensible approach of local people and have assumed that that is why buildings are still standing after high winds and bits don't fly around during gales. Falkland Islanders protect their property and their vegetable gardens in a practical and sensible way.

What went wrong over the Stanley Cottage decision?

Sorry, I know that I should be grateful but, when you are living in a house or working in an office, practicality and common sense often take over from aesthetics.

More top tips from the Bushman

BUMPER Jacks are great and many campers swear by them; but even with timber spreaders they can sink into the soft ground and cause many of us to despair- not so with a 'Bull

This is a comparatively new innovation. It is a heavy duty rubber bag that can be attached to the exhaust system with a hose so that a running engine can inflate it. Simply take your spade and prepare a level base for the 'Bull Bag' and in-flate it, it can lift a rover up to a metre without sinking into the earth

As a precaution I usually lay a piece of old tarp or my coat over the bag to protect it from sharp arrises. If you cannot track one

down in local shops try the internet, and let us all know the address.

I was given two excellent pieces of advice when I first drove in camp, always park into the wind and keep your thumbs on top of the steering wheel. The first will save your doors and the second your thumbs if you hit a rut.

Over the next couple of weeks I will provide you with a few first -aid tips to get you back on the trail, but remember these are 'bush remedies' there is no substitute for having your vehicle regularly serviced and carrying a good spares

Penelope proves seaworthy

UNTIL they took to the seagoing life, Michael and Jeannette Clarke were our nearest neighbours by direct land connection. We found the article about the *Penelope*, her replacement and the delivery voyage most interesting and we wish Michael and Jeannette smooth sailing and every success with the *Condor*.

The following addition to the history of the *Penelope* may be of interest.

The ship was bought from Weddell Island in 1948, I seem to remember, by the Falkland Islands Dependency Survey with a view to using her as a shuttle among the bases and for moving scientists around their various sites.

The Penelope was overhauled in Stanley by the Falkland Islands Company (FIC), a new and large engine (Ruston Hornsby I recall) was installed, modifications to her accommodation were completed and modern radio equipment fitted in the wheelhouse.

A Royal Navy officer, Lt. George Selby-Smith was appointed her captain and she was ready to go sometime in 1949 but Lt. Selby-Smith decided she was not sufficiently seaworthy to make the journey south and refused to sail so she remained in the Falklands.

At what pace and order her ownership changes came after that I am not sure, but she seemed to be under the control of the Falkland Islands Government for a time and made many voyages to farms with passengers, stores, fuel and animals under the command of former Navy Lt. John Huckle (footloose in the Falklands after being stuck at Marguerite Bay in the Antarctic for three years when the base couldn't be relieved because the ice prevented ship visits).

John's first voyage with the *Penelope* was to Salvador Waters at the beginning of January, 1950 and I was due to be a passenger from Stanley but slept in and missed the sailing! While embarassed in the first realisation, I was much relieved later in the day because the ship sailed into a terrific gale and heavy rain out of the Northeast and was some 12 hours reaching Rincon Grande. It was apparently, a dreadful voyage but John was so confident that the ship was seaworthy, he pressed on and history shows his judgement was correct.

There was a tragic accident on the ship while at Rincon Grande on a later voyage when she was under the command of a very experienced local seaman called Mansell Rutter. In a rising wind, he went on deck during the night to pay out more chain and became fouled in the windlass where he was later found dead by members of his crew.

Mussel study: Funds 'well spent'

WE WOULD like to respond briefly to your editorial of September 17.

The aim of the Mussel Industry Group is to establish if it would be commercially feasible to establish a mussel farming, processing and marketing operation on a significant scale here.

That is, on a scale and in a time frame that could make a real difference to the economy in important ways. For example; in terms of commercial profitability with consequent tax revenues; the introduction of a variety of new skills; support for communications links and investment opportunities.

One of the advantages of the study proposed is that investment institutions will use it to evaluate funding requests from companies and individuals who seek to participate in any such industry here.

If the study shows that such a venture is feasible and things do go ahead, the project would have the potential to make possible smaller scale operations throughout the Falklands.

But first it is necessary to find out if such a major investment stands a chance of making a return. Local business people have spent time and money improving their knowledge of the mussel farming world, and Falklands Fresh Limited is making an important contribution with its hard won knowledge of the business of mussel production here. However such a study requires a wider experience and knowledge than is currently available here.

In our view the level of development funds and resources being made available to have this work carried out will be very well spent either way. By helping to avoid an expensive mistake, or hopefully, by indicating how we can best establish another major industry in the Falklands.

The study will be available for anyone interested to buy, it will probably not provide all the answers but will be a critically important tool to assist in the evaluation of the prospects of a mussel industry.

We think anyone with an interest in developing the Falklands economy will welcome it.

Camp telephones 'out of date'

The camp telephone system in the Falklands is nearing. "...the end of its life." according to Dr Chris Doyle, a telecommunications consultant from the UK who visited the Islands last week.

Dr Doyle said it is likely the manufacturer of the serviceable parts no longer make some of the key components of the camp system because. "...in telecommunications terms it's basically out of date."

There is a degree of urgency to replace the present Camp telephone system said Dr Doyle. "Cable and Wireless don't have a huge shed full of spares, they have spares which are dwindling, and so if there were a severe lightning strike, which is always a possibility, which blew out some of the repeaters dotted around the Islands, it could have a, "...catastrophic effect and disrupt the service completely.

"The current system, while it does a reasonably good job of accommodating voice telephony, was not really designed for the kind of data services people want available today."

Dr Doyle explained how he was originally invited to the Falklands to. "...overview the possible replacement of the camp telephone system," at the behest of the Falkland Islands Government. However he said his role had changed since arriving in the Islands. "My role has broadened somewhat from originally just focusing on the camp system to focusing on the entire system with an emphasis on the camp system.

"You can't look at the camp system on its own in isolation from the rest. The two are not mutually exclusive. The Islands are at a point where the current technology that supports the overall system is old. Cable and Wireless know that and they too are considering replacements and those replacements will have a fundamental impact on the kind of services you will get in Stanley and at Mount Pleasant. A lot will happen I think over the next two or three years, not only in camp but everywhere.

"I think you will see some quite big steps taken to improve the service and I hope also that you will begin to see changes in prices in the right direction which is down, rather than up."

Dr Doyle is an economist specialising in telecommunications with experience of consulting in a number of different parts of the world including Africa, the Caribbean, Australia and New Zealand. He has also had experience of dealing with local service provider Cable and Wireless elsewhere in the world so he feels he is well equipped to deal with, "... many

of the issues which are pertinent to the Falklands today."

Dr Doyle spent last week meeting and talking to local residents both in camp and in Stanley. He said he has found that, "...people are broadly satisfied with the voice telephony service, but, with regard to the internet, there's very much dissatisfaction and a demand for faster and better services," adding. obviously, providing faster and better services isn't something that can be done with no cost, it entails investment, so the issue is how fast should the service be and when do we introduce the faster and better services, they are issues that I'll be addressing in my report.

"Someone has to pay for the infrastructure that's put in place so a balance has to be struck between having faster services and reasonable prices."

Pricing of the services is also an area Dr Doyle will be looking at. "An area of my report will focus on the tariff structure," he said. "I haven't formed any firm conclusions yet but my preliminary views are leading me to the view that prices are probably high for many of the services, particularly high for calling the rest of the world and the UK, and seem high for dial up internet access."

Dr Doyle stressed that the aim of his report is to ensure that the pricing structure is reasonable. He continued, "...if prices are adjusted, it's not with a mandate to be anti Cable and Wireless or whoever it is, it's just to be fair. Fair that they get a decent return running their business, fair on the customers who shouldn't pay an excessive amount for the service - I think dial up prices need to come down."

Overseas calls are also a concern for Dr Doyle. "What I believe to be probably high prices are call-

ing out to the UK, calling out to St Helena which a lot of people do here, and calling out to Chile. All of these seem high to me and prices haven't come down by anywhere near as much as they've come down elsewhere in the world for these types of call and I include in that small islands in other parts of the world.

I think the Falklands are at a very important point in their development in terms of communications infrastructure. I think you have in place a system which has done reasonably well given the rather testing terrain and challenging environment here over quite a number of years but because the world has moved very quickly over the last few years, everyone wants internet access and it's putting pressure on the provider here. Cable and Wireless to provide similar services. Change is needed and I know they recognise that change needs to be brought

On the subject a of mobile telephone service, Dr Doyle said he had posed that question to new General Manager of Cable and Wireless, Rick Hall who is planning on conducting a review into the viability of offering a mobile service. From his own point of view, Dr Doyle said he would be, .. very surprised if it is not viable but we are talking about a small customer base so it is conceivable it may not be." He said the current preliminary proposal is a mobile system which would cover Stanley, Mount Pleasant and the corridor in between and Berkeley Sound which, he said. "... would give you not much geographic coverage of the Islands as a whole, but population coverage of about 80 per cent.'

Coverage in camp for such a

system would be very difficult to achieve according to Dr Doyle due to the huge amount of power needed to supply the base stations - far more than is required to power the repeaters currently used for the camp system. "...in Stanley the power system could accommodate a base station, but it wouldn't be able to feed power out anywhere and that's why you'd have such limited coverage."

"They would install a system that almost certainly would be compatible with most of the systems you see around the world and the chances are you would have roaming agreements so you would be able to use your phone in the UK. Chile or wherever."

When asked if he knew of anywhere else in the world with similar communications challenges Dr Doyle replied, "No, in a nutshell. I have to say, I can't think of any. Dr Doyle continued by outlining why the Islands were so unique in terms of communications. have satellite access only, you could have fibre optic cables but there are issues of where they would go to, so it's satellite access, the small population, and a population outside of Stanley which is very dispersed also contribute to the unique situation.

Regulation of the service provider is another issue Dr Doyle will be addressing in his report. He explained that, "...historically you have one telephone company in every country in the world. It may be private as in America with AT&T but it is still subject to regulation, or it is often publicly owned as in Britain with British Telecom but it is subject to regulation."

A single operator is given the exclusive franchise on the proviso that they would not, "...exploit or rather abuse their position or dominance of being the single operator." Dr Doyle suggested that this needed to be looked at in the Falklands. "My view is that some of the issues here are not solely the fault of Cable and Wireless - there is the question of who has been overseeing the business."

Dr Doyle left the Islands last Saturday and said that his visit had been "amazing." He continued, "What has impressed me most apart from the scenery is the people. The community here is really impressive, especially the generosity, particularly in camp. I would arrive, walk into the farm house, and there would be two million cakes on the table! It's been good, I've enjoyed it. I certainly didn't expect it to be as vibrant and as affluent as it is.

"It's surprising also the cosmopolitan nature of the Falklands. You normally expect island communities to be quite inward looking and parochial but there are so many nationalities here - it's a bit of a melting pot."



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
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Health and Medical Department update

MILK from Stanley Dairy is still being tested weekly for Listeria Senior Medical Officer. Dr Roger Diggle told a meeting of the Health and Medical Services Committee

on Monday.

Dr Diggle said tests would continue for a further two weeks and if the results continued to be negative the milk would be considered safe for everyone. At present it is recommended that high risk members of the community, that is pregnant women, the very young, the elderly and anyone whose immunity is poor for any reason, should boil the milk before consumption.

The Board of Health is looking into the possibility of allowing a large quantity of frozen mince held by the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCO) being rapidly defrosted made into smaller packs and refrozen for human consump-

tion.

Dr Diggle said his initial reaction was to say no, however the issue would be given further consideration with the possibility of the meat being used for pet food initially and bacteriologically tested on a regular basis to monitor deterioration with age. If it is fit and approval is given, then any sale for human consumption would have to be clearly marked so that it would not be thawed and frozen again.

Medical services used overseas were discussed and in particular the

service in Chile.

Dr Diggle said 58 patients had been sent to Chile in the last financial year, adding that he was, "satisfied," with the treatment they had received. He said one of the advantages of sending patients to Chile was, "... the short period of time spent out of the Islands."

Director of Health Norman McGregor Edwards said there are less complaints from patients who have been to Chile than those who were sent to UK. He said one of the main complaints from patients sent to UK was the waiting times between appointments as they are treated as National Health Service (NHS) patients. In Chile treatment is being paid for so is immediately available.

The committee heard that language problems had been experienced in the past, however there are now two English speaking nurses at the Clinic Alamana who always look after Falkland Island patients and even go to the hotel to check on patient's well being.

Mr McGregor Edwards said there are several "stringers" to help patients and their family in Chile, adding that the hospital (KEMH) does send a member of family to help patients when needed.

Lay member of the Health and Medical Services Committee Jason Lewis asked why dentistry patients are waiting excessive times for appointments? Mr McGregor Edwards explained that waiting times had gone up due to staff illness adding that he was hopeful a locum would visit for four weeks

in the very near future to prevent further backlog of appointments.

On the subject of patients being charged for treatment should they fail to obtain an appointment within the two year period of free treatment Councillor Mike Summers said, "...common sense has to be applied," saying patients would obviously not be charged for treatment if they had been unable to get an appointment because of a backlog due to staff illness or other reasons.

Mr McGregor Edwards said camp dentist visits had been cancelled for the time being for the same reason and would be reinstated

as soon as possible.

On the subject of making hospital appointments by e-mail it was considered possible for routine appointments but was not encouraged as it can result in confusion with delays between requests and confirmation of dates.

New appointments within the medical department include new nurse, Joanne Lane-Sanson and anaesthetist Tony Rocke is joining the team for his eighth spell.

There are two locum doctors here at present; David Morgan who is employed until February, 2005 and Alvin Skinstad who will be replaced by Denise Hannl from October 9, for four weeks.

The new GP will be Dr Murtaza Khanbhai who will arrive in February 2005 for an initial one year contract.

Fruit fom the USA

FRESH fruit from as far afield as the United States of America is now gracing the fresh produce cabinets in the West Store.

Tim Miller from Stanley Growers said he was pleased to announce the arrival of the first airfreight shipment consisting of red and green seedless grapes, melons, nectarines, peaches, plums and mangoes.

Tim said. "not suprisingly" the produce is more expensive because of the distance it is transported, adding, "it is grown in California, the USA's sunshine state."

Tim explained how the order is packed and inspected by US Department of Agriculture in Miami on Tuesday. On Wednesday it is flown by airfreighter to Santiago where it goes into transit cool store until it is flown down to Punt Arenas on Friday evening and across here on Saturday.

To comply with Chilean plant health transit regulations the produce is packed in large sealed cartons with ice gel packs to keep it chilled. Tim said, "this all adds to the weight, the airfreight on the icepacks alone was £280.

"We hope that this new service will improve the all year round availability of seasonal fresh produce when Chile is out of season. It will also enable cruise ships to obtain some products here which are unavailable in Argentina or Chile."

The role of the Clinical Development Officer

Recipes for the Falkland Islands Arabian Baked trout

With the fishing season well under way this is a spicy and simple way to enjoy the one that 'didn't get away'

Ingredients

- 2 trout fillets
- I teaspoon ground cumin
- I teaspoon ground coriander
- a pinch of cayenne pepper 2 tablespoons chopped fresh
- parsley
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh coriander
- I garlic clove, crushed
- 2 tablespoons plain yoghurt Juice of 2 limes
- 2 tablespoons olive oil

Method

Place the trout in a shallow ovenproof dish.

In a non stick frying pan dry fry the cumin, coriander and pinch of cayenne over a low heat for one minute.

Wool report - week ending September 27

WOOL prices around the world continued the pattern of the last few weeks, with movements generally of only one or two pence per kilogram clean, up and down across the micron spectrum.

Very fine wools were the exception, posting quite solid gains of 5 to 10 p/kg clean.

In Australia, 59,698 bales of wool were offered to the trade. 49,917 bales were sold, with 9,781 bales passed-in (16.4%). Included in the offering were 3,182 bales of crossbred wool, of which 2,857 bales were sold (10.20% passed-in). In New Zealand there was a relatively poor 73%, clearance of the 7,540 bales on offer, while in South Africa, only 77% of the 7,255 bales on offer were sold.

Trawler Arcay Dos transhipped between September 18 - 20 and Tasarte on September 20 - 21.


Reefer *Pamyat Ilicha* called at Port William for a crew change on September 20 and *Sierra Nafria* transhipped in the same area on September 22.

Oil prices reach a new high

WORLD OIL prices reached new records on Monday with US light crude poised to break 50 US dollars per barrel (U\$S 49.64) following mounting fears about oil supply given growing tensions in Nigeria and the Middle East.

Devastating hurricanes in southern United States when oil demand keeps increasing and world reserves are at their lowest also fuelled prices, which according to New York analysts would soon top 50 US dollars per barrel, probably this week. In the long run oil could even peak to 60 US dollars per barrel, warned an American investment bank

Oil traders said fears about political unrest in Nigeria oil producing region could cut or limit output with further pressure on prices. Shell and Agip have evacuated non essential personnel from the Nigeria delta where government forces are fighting insurgents.

Similarly, recent clashes between Saudi Arabian police and suspected Islamic militants have caused growing concern as well as the semi permanent disruption scene in war torn Iraq.

However OPEC's president

Purnomo Yusgiantoro questioned the latest price surge saying that this is not the price of the OPEC basket, but rather it's the price of US crude influenced by hurricane Ivan and other problems in other

Hurricane Ivan has temporarily limited offshore production and refining activities in the Gulf of Mexico which is now 28% below its normal output of 1.7 million bpd.

To counterbalance the situation the US Energy Department took the unusual step of releasing some of the national stockpiles of crude to refineries.

Meantime investment bank Morgan Stanley cautioned its clients that oil prices could reach 60 US dollars the barrel, before they begin to drop.

"Price tendency on the long run indicates even higher prices," said the Morgan Stanley report which supports the statement saving that world oil demand, the highest in 24 years, is strangling production since only Saudi Arabia has some limited spare pumping capacity.

Oil prices so far this year have increased 50% and stand at all time record since 1983.

Joint Patagonia tourism promotion

HEADS of town governments from the Magallanes Region in Chile and the Argentine provinces of Santa Cruz and Tierra del Fuego signed this week in Punta Arenas a Patagonia South-to-South integration agreement with the purpose of improving links and promoting the area overseas.

The ceremony in Punta Arenas Town Hall was headed by the governor of Magallanes Region Jaime Jelincic, mayor of Punta Arenas Juan Morano and mayor of Rio Grande. Jorge Martin.

Mr Martin said the Patagonia integration project must, "in the near future become a free trade area."

Juan Morano, Punta Arenas mayor, pointed out that the agreement was the framework for a joint development of the area which must be led by the private sector from both countries, "particularly the promotion of the tourism industry.

The project also contemplates other areas for joint strategic development such as trade, industry, environment and conservation, science and technology.

Among the first challenges are organising and promoting tourist packages covering both sides of Patagonia, and sponsoring environment conservation classes at school

Record unemployment levels in Chile

IN SPITE of the strong recovery of the Chilean economy, unemployment in the quarter June-August 2004 reached 9.9%, 0.5% over the same period a year ago and a 0.2% increase over the previous quarter, according to the latest release from the Chilean Statistics Institute, INE.

The figure is the highest since September 2001 when unemployment reached 10.1%.

The release also indicates that the work force in the last twelve months increased 1.9%, with the employed expanding 1.3% and the unemployed 7.3%. This means that in the June-August the Chilean labour force reached 6.135,690 people, with 5,530,230 employed and 605,460 unemployed.

Further on the release indicates that the most employment dynamic sectors in the last two quarters have been mining and quarries; financial services; and public utilities (electricity, gas and fuel).
Regarding industrial activity, the

INE release shows a sustained growth in the last quarter, June-August, which represents a 9% expansion over the previous quarter and 6.5% in the last twelve months.

Exciting opportunities ahead

DESPITE having to leave the event earlier than the rest of the suppliers in order to make the connection at Santiago for the return flight to the Falklands, both Falkland Islands' Receptive Agents reported an encouraging increase in the number of appointments with travel agents at this year's Travel Mart Latin America.

The Falkland Islands Tourist industry was represented at the 28th Annual Travel Mart Latin America in Iguazu Falls Brazil, by Connie Stevens (Falkland Islands Tourist Board), Sally Ellis (International Tours and Travel) and Jenny Luxton (Stanley Services).

At this year's event, over 300 'buyers' from the world's most important markets, including USA, Canada, Europe, Asia and the Pacific attended and a record number of 5,768 business appointments were pre-scheduled prior to the event starting on September 29.

Connie Stevens said, "Interest in the Falklands was high and feedback from North Americans was that we need to promote ourselves more there." Jenny Luxton of Stanley Services said, "There was a lack of awareness of our fantastic wildlife and more generally, simply how to get to the Falklands. A great deal of birdwatchers were very interested in adding a week's visit onto their Patagonian itineraries to the Falklands."

Jenny also noted that the once

weekly flight was again a stumbling block. "I felt we would get a lot more business if people came for four days or ten days from Chile. One thing I hadn't realised is that the North American's do not have a great deal of holiday to spend abroad and two weeks is about their maximum on average.

"Whilst Falkland Islanders are accustomed to longer breaks, two weeks is generally the maximum in the USA and with the travel time involved, this only leaves a maximum of eight to ten days for actual holiday time here. Onward travel within the islands becomes a crucial factor here, to ensure that visitors can be flown straight out to the wildlife sites upon arrival on the LAN flight."

ITT were also very pleased with the full schedule of meetings over the two day event. Sally Ellis explained, "At this year's Travel Mart, meetings were held both with tour operators we already work with and some new agencies from all over the world. The general consensus is that given the unrest in other parts of the world people are looking for new holiday destinations, and operators are therefore keen to make contact with the Falklands."

Connie Stevens, of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board said, "key feedback from the event is that travel to Latin America as a whole in on the increase, so the outlook is ex-

tremely good for the Falklands and there could be some exciting oppor-tunities ahead. It will take time for actual sales of Falklands programmes to be generated directly as a result of our attendance at Travel Mart but we would certainly have missed out on a dynamic sales opportunity if we had not been represented. The continued attendance of Falklands delegates at these events keeps us in the public eye, helps to promote our growing tourism industry and generally raises the profile of the Falkland Islands as a significant destination. Most important is the opportunity to make direct sales contact with operators who can make a real difference to the number of visitors to the Falkland Islands.

All three delegates report that existing contacts were eager to learn of any new developments within the tourism industry in the Falklands and it was apparent that other destinations are constantly expanding their industries and developing their infrastructure. Connie Stevens notes that, "for the future development of the Tourism industry in the Falklands, whilst we obviously need to selectively promote to new markets it is also clear that we need to improve and develop our existing product to ensure we retain the business of our existing clients. We are in a competitive and ever-more discerning market - we have to ensure we are delivering the goods."

News in brief

Fishing update

The licensing round for the first 2005 fishing season was closed last week.

Director of Fisheries John Barton said the final total for Illex licence applications was 91. Mr Barton said, "this is a bit reduced compared to the number of applications received this time last year, although it is close to the number which actually took up licences in 2004.

"It represents a reasonable level

"It represents a reasonable level of interest in the fishery and is encouraging at this stage in the process. However, there is a long way to go."

Mr Barton said applications for other licence types; Loligo and Finfish, were much as normal. The second Loligo season finished with a catch of 18200 tonnes, which makes to a "reasonable" second season. The total Loligo catch for the year is some 26800 tonnes which is, "a low annual catch."

Cover comb shearing

THE Veterinary Department have offered a reminder to farmers that until October 15, sheep must only be shorn using cover combs.

Even after that date cover combs should be considered for shearing if the weather forecast indicates that post-shearing weather conditions are likely to be particularly unpleasant as laid out in the Code of Practice for the welfare of sheep.

Ambassador-designate visits Islands

BRITISH Ambassador designate to Buenos Aires, Mr John Hughes was in the Falklands on a fact-finding tour this week accompanied by Mr Tony Crombie, Head of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office's Overseas Territories Department.

Mr Hughes, who takes up his appointment on November 5 is no stranger to the South American political scene, having preceded ex Falkland Islands Governor, Donald Lamont as Ambassador to Venezuela. He also served between 1983 and 1985 as the Head of the Political Section in the British Embassy in Santiago, Chile.

The visitors arrived in the Islands on Monday and spent Tuesday meeting a variety of Government officials and others before spending two days in Camp, travelling overland from Port Stephens to Port Howard on Wednesday. After overnighting at Port Howard, they drove to Hill Cove from where they where returned to Stanley by FIGAS. Friday

will be spent with the military at Mount Pleasant before Mr Hughes and Mr Crombie leave for the UK on Saturday's Airbus.

THIS week's Penguin News is a special, if a little self-indulgent, edition. The paper has reached the quarter century so we felt the need to draw attention to the fact that the Penguin News has been reporting, recording and chronicling the goings on in the Falklands for 25 years.

It is a wonder the feature in the centre pages on the paper's history ever got written at all as I spent hours and hours in the archives reading old copies of the paper, marvelling at the stories, many of which are still issues today, and occasionally laughing at the odd headline such as, "Argentines harass Poles" (no, really). I could have spent all weekend there but I doubt my long suffering Editor would have been all that pleased that the sum total of my weekend's work

would have been a slightly misty eyed nostalgic look on my face

The Penguin News has changed dramatically in its 25 year history which I hope is illustrated by the centre page feature. However, certain aspects of the paper are, and should be, timeless. In his very first editorial, founder Graham Bound writes that the three vital functions of a newspaper here in the Falklands should be. "...supplying news of interest to local readers, supplying news of interest to overseas readers, and finally, reflecting the views and feelings of the community" These three principles remain the ethos of the Penguin News and it is imperative that they continue to do so. To tackle them one by one, it is well known that we rarely get to "break" a news story on Friday morning without FIBS getting there first on Thursday night, and it always seems to us that everything really news worthy happens on a Friday, meaning by the time we can report on it, the story is old. In spite of this, stories must be covered and it is the job of the Penguin News staff to make sure that even news deemed past its sell by date is reported in a way that is still interesting to readers -perhaps looking at a story from a different angle or any possible consequences it may

Graham's point that the paper must also provide news for overseas readers is, if anything, more true now than when he wrote it. In a previous anniversary edition of the paper celebrating 100 issues in 1987, the then editor Belinda Caminada wrote of the Penguin News, "It is read in the United Nations and Foreign Office as well as in countries as far flung as Australia and Japan. It is the means by which the Falkland Islands can talk to the world." Since that was written the international profile of the Falklands has risen considerably and the *Penguin News* certainly has a role to play in ensuring that profile is a positive one

These are both essential features of the paper, but I still believe one of the Penguin News' most important job is to provide a forum for people to air their views and grievances so that the people of the Falklands have a chance to make their voice heard. Through all my research of back copies, the letters page is always the first one I turn to as it provides a true indication of the issues current in people's minds. If someone has been moved to write a letter to the local paper in this small community and thus stick their head above the parapet for all to see, they must really feel strongly about their subject. In some ways this is more important than the news section of a newspaper which can provide the

facts, but these invariably only tell half the story.

It is from the letters and editorials that I have hopefully gained some understanding of the feeling in the Islands pre 1982. It seems to me to have been one of disting uncertainty about the future of the klands, both economically and politically. The Falklands of that time would have been delighted to have the kind of problems we find ourselves facing now. There is concern about dwindling fish stocks and our neighbours continue to try to cause us problems. yet the picture now is distinctly more rosy than the one painted by the Penguin News' of the late seventies and early eighties. At least now we have a national income that, even if it does diminish should be capable of funding our selfsufficiency for a long time to come and equally important, we now have a firm commitment from the British Government which should safeguard our political future. My point is, the Islands have come a long way in the 25 years that Penguin News has been charting their progress, but we want to be charting the next 25 years of progress as well, and the 25 after that, so we must ensure that the Falklands remain in the ascendancy.

On a slightly different note, our Acting Editor noted in one of her recent editorials that we are well aware of "the two minute silence" label local wags have given the paper, but in the last few weeks I've spent working here, I've realised what an important part the Penguin News plays in our community. When delivering the papers on Friday morning, a couple of people are there, ready and waiting at the printing office to get their copy before anyone else. The story is the same all round town. On my first day delivering I took a slightly different route to that followed by the usual staff and on arrival at one shop found a quite sizable group of people who were not happy that their normal routine had been disrupted by having to wait for me to deliver their paper. For all I know they may only be anxious to see who is selling what on the back page or what time Eastenders is on but even so, that is an important part of the paper and Fran can be proud that her pages are the first to be read.

Similarly, last Friday's LegCo broadcast was quite a boost for us here in the office as there were several references made to that morning's PN. It was a very real example of how the paper can promote discussion and draw attention to

certain issues that may not otherwise be widely known.

Lastly, a few 'thank you's on my part are necessary. Firstly to Jenny Cockwell (Editor) for going away on holiday and giving me the chance to be a part of what former editor Belinda Caminada terms "the exclusive Penguin News Club." Also to Fran and especially Sharon who have been patient and encouraging and most of all great to work with. I have loved every minute.

Questions for oral answer

Landholdings return to profitability?

COUNCILLOR Mike Summers asked Councillor Richard Cockwell. "... what plans are in place to return Falkland Landholdings to profitability? And, in particular, what strategies will be employed to achieve this?"

In response, Mr Richard Cockwell said that issue had been a matter of concern for the Board of Falkland Landholdings for some time, adding, "Plans are in place to return Falkland andholdings to profitability."

Mr Cockwell went on to say that sheep numbers on Falkland Landholdings farms have declined significantly over the last six years. "The Board and Management have implemented plans to restore numbers to at least their original levels of some five to ten years ago. The wool quality on Falkland Landholdings farms today is significantly coarser than the majority of Falkland farms, whereas wool weights are similar. In today's wool market, this is a distinct disadvantage and plans are already in place to improve the quality of the wool clip by three micron, which has the potential to increase wool values in today's prices by as much as 58p per kilo. The introduction of the Abattoir and meat industry has significant potential for the farms but sheep numbers have to be rectified first.

"Over the last six months, the

cost of central administration has been reduced. Other areas of cost reduction and recovery, particularly in the areas of Community Service are also under consideration.

Councillor Summers followed up this answer with a further question asking whether, "...the Company is likely to be seeking additional Government Funding to support its cash flow?"

Councillor Cockwell stated that it was not the intention of Landholdings at this stage to seek further funding or further support and that if this was required, it was, hoped to be done on the commercial market through the bank rather than coming back to the Government." He continued, "...it is not our intention and not our expectation at this moment that it will be necessary.

Councillor Birmingham continued on this subject by asking Mr Cockwell, "...when Falkland Islands Landholdings was last in profit, or even if it was ever in profit?"

Being unable to answer in detail, Mr Cockwell said, "... I understand that historically it has actually returned a profit, possibly before the time that it was owned by the Falkland Islands Government. But it was capable of returning a profit and, as certain farms around the Islands are able to be in profit, there's no reason why Landholdings shouldn't be able to do the same

Jetty Centre car parking progress

THE CHAIR of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board has given an update about the car parking situation around the Jetty Centre. Responding to a question asked by Councillor Mike Summers about progress on this matter, Councillor John Birmingham said, "...work has been started by PWD around the south of the Jetty Centre in extending the car

parking facilities there. Discussions with the Falkland Islands Company regarding the land owned by them next door to the Jubilee Warehouse are on going at the moment.

Regarding the provision of parking for the public in that area, I think by the time the works are completed there will be very few

complaints.'

Dental visit cancellations due to 'illness'

CONCERN as to the future of camp dentist visits has been expressed of late following the cancellation of the normal dental visits to Fox Bay and the removal of the dentist equipment from the surgery at Fox Bay

Director of Health Services, Norman McGregor Edwards, said the reason for the cancellation of the visits was due to illness which left insufficient staff available to cover Stanley and do the camp visits at the same time.

He said, "It had absolutely nothing to do with the decision to dispose of the Fox Bay house - KEMH had asked that the eventual owners be required to continue to provide the facility. Shortly afterwards, however, it was reported that the equipment in the Fox Bay Surgery had deteriorated and was no longer safe to use - an engineering inspection has since confirmed that to

"Given that the Fox Bay House has badly deteriorated and is to be disposed of, there seemed little point in simply replacing the Fox Bay dental equipment. Consequently, we now have a unique opportunity to look again at the best way of continuing to provide highquality dental services not just to Fox Bay but to all of Camp.

Mr McGregor Edwards said the Health Service has already started looking at different ways of providing dental services to remote settlements adding, "...there are a

wide number of options.

"Advice is being sought from Scotland, which has similar problems to ourselves, and from suppliers of specialist equipment as well as our own dental staff. As soon as we have gathered all the necessary information, we will be discussing the options and making suitable recommendations.

'Ball is in Argentine court' UK Party conferences finish

the subject of flights between the South American continent and the Falklands, then they should first respond to the British proposals on the table said His Excellency the Governor, Howard Pearce

Without giving details. Governor Pearce said that it was no secret that proposals made to the Argentine Government by Britain, after detailed consultation with Falkland Islands councillors, had not met with approval in Buenos Aires. What had not been made plain was the reason why these proposals, for an 'open skies' policy with regard to charter flights to the Falklands, had not proved acceptable. Until these reasons had been explained, "it was difficult to take things forward." said Mr Pearce. Maintaining that the position of the UK Government is clear that no agreement regarding flights will be made without the consent of the Falkland Islanders themselves, the Governor concluded The ball is in the Argentine court.

Several days ago Argentine Foreign Minister Rafael Bielsa repeated Argentina's demand for direct tina. He again made it clear that Argentina wants this before it would consider allowing the resumption of non-Argentine charter flights to the Falklands that he suspended last year. Making the point that he would not discuss this with the Islanders he said. "We talk to Great Britain. We don't talk to Crown subjects who inhabit

Argentine territory."

Over some years the Falkland Islands has been building a reputation as a gateway port for expedition cruise ships operating to Antarctica and South Georgia. This growing segment of the Islands tourist industry, which offers a number of commercial spin-offs to local service providers and produce suppliers, depends largely on charter flights from Chile to carry cruise ship passengers to and from the Islands. The ban on such flights, shortly after the beginning of the last Southern Hemisphere tourist season, dealt a serious blow to tourism in the Falklands, but coincidentally favoured the Argentine Antarctic gateway port of Ushuaia.



Argentine Embassy tourism protest Roz treks Ethiopia for charity

"THE Argentine Government wishes to remind that the Malymas Islands. Southern Georgias and South Sandwich Islands and the maritime spaces around them are an integral part of the Argentine national territory and illegitimately occupied by the United Kingdom of Britain and Northern Ireland, are the subject of a sovereignty dispute between the two countries

This was part of the text of a letter received in August at the Jacksonville, Florida offices of W.H Coleman Inc. a company which specialises in the organisation of international events for the travel trade and specifically Travel Mart Latin America, recently held in Foz do Iguazu, Brazil.

The letter was sent by the Argentine Embassy in Washington and was prompted by the inclusion of companies from the Falkland Islands among the destinations represented

The unsigned letter also says. The Argentine Republic also rejects the participation in the Travel Mart and the registration in its web site of individuals or entities that define themselves as originating from the Islands as them being a territory separate from the Argentine Repub-

Travel Mart Latin America is an annual commercially organised event, which brings together specialist travel operators from around the world and South American destination representatives. It is held each year in a different city in Latin

Every year since 1998, the Falkland Islands has been represented, originally by the Tourist Board and more recently also by representa-tives of receptive travel agencies in


the Islands. Similar representations have been made before to the or-ganisers. W.H.Coleman Inc. who have chosen to ignore them. Usually, however, they have been made at a local consular level.

This new protest by the Argentine Embassy in Washington is consistent with a string of similar recent restatements of the Argentine position over the Falklands by high ranking officials, including Foreign Minister Rafael Bielsa and Ambassador to the UN, Cesar Mayoral, Both have recently been at some pains to emphasise that from their perspective. Falkland Islanders do not exist as a separate people, entitled to selfdetermination.

His Excellency the Governor. Mr Howard Pearce, described such attitudes on the part of the Argentine Government as "a disappointment" to the British Government. Britain, he said, wishes to have good cooperation and bilateral relations with Argentina on, "a whole range of issues, including the South Atlan-He said the key to the British Government's position over the Falkland Islands was its consistent and firm backing of the Islanders' right to self-determination. The Governor said this was "a fact of life" which the Argentine Government would ultimately have to ac-

On a lighter note, the Falkland Islands participants at Travel Mart enjoyed the event's opening ceremony on the Argentine side of the Iguazu Falls, all the more because their Mercosur identity cards, issued for the occasion by the Argentine authorities, all proudly bore the nationality, British.

September weather from Mount Pleasant

SEPTEMBER was a slightly sun-nier and windier month than aver-

The month was marked by cold periods with snowfall, but with mild weather in the main giving an above average temperature on the whole. Rainfall was average for the month. Sunshine was slightly above average as was wind speed with the second half of the month being particularly windy.

The mean maximum temperature for the month was 8.2C against the average of 7.4C. The highest temperature on record was 14.3C on the 5th. The lowest maximum was 2.2C recorded on the 9th. The mean temperature was 1.4C against the average of 0.8C. The lowest minimum temperature was -4C recorded on the 14th. There were eight nights of frost and 22 nights with a ground frost.

Rainfall was very close to average with 34mm against an average

of 35mm. The highest daily total of 4.4mm fell on the 15th. There were 18 days of 0.1mm or more and seven days with 1.0mm or more. Fog occurred on three days.

Snow fell on 10 days. The beginning of the second week and the fourth week saw the worst conditions. Blizzard conditions pre-vailed on the 25th and 26th of the

Sunshine was normal for the month with 142.1 hours against an average of 130.5 hours. The sunni-est day was 10.7 hours on the

It was generally a windy month, but more particularly in the second half. The mean speed of 17.4kts was slightly above the average of 15.5kts. The highest gust recorded was 65kts on the 4th. Gusts exceeding 33kts occurred on 22 days, compared with the average of 17 days.

News from the September Executive Council meeting

Bid for EU funded training Where the streets have new names

HIS Excellency the Governor Howard Pearce said that following an initiative by Councillor Summers during a meeting in Brussels last December, a proposal has been worked on with the French territories of St Pierre & Miquelon and with representatives of Greenland for a training course on aquaculture to be funded by the European Development Fund.

Executive Council considered a paper about the bid and agreed to support the submission of the funding bid to the European Commission. If the bid is successful, up to 15 persons from the Falkland Islands will be invited to take part in the course in St Pierre & Miquelon in September next year.

Mr Pearce said that councillors had been unanimous in their agrement that it was a good idea and a good way to use European funds should they become available. He said the total value of the project

would be between 180,000 to 190,000 Euro to be split betwen the three territories.

Mr Pearce said the European Union likes joint bids adding, "It is often in the interest of the Falkland Islands if we can get together with others who have a similar interest."

When asked how people would be selected for the training Mr Pearce said it was a little early to answer that question although it might be possible for Falkland Islands Government to fund additional participants on the course, adding that it was an issue that had not been addressed as yet.

Mr Pearce said people who were going to bring the most benefit to a future aquaculture industry would be selected for the course adding applicants would have to be "judged on their merits."

Aviation and Maritime Security Act

HIS Excellency the Governor said another important piece of legislation on the Executive Council agenda was the Aviation and Maritime Security Act 1990 (Application of Provisions) Bill, which was submitted for consideration by Legislative Council the following day.

The legislation makes provisions for changes to the law required in connection with the new security regime for handling international shipping in the Falklands.

MR Pearce said street names was an item bound to excite strong feelings in the community.

He said, "Members of the public responded enthusiastically and imaginatively to the invitation from Stanley Lands Committee for street names for the new sheltered housing complex and the new housing development west of Government House near the old BFFI site."

Executive Council decided to approve the Lands Committee's recommendations and to name the

sheltered housing complex on Villiers Street 'Yates Place,' and to name the new housing development 'Haskard Rise,' subject in the latter case to Sir Cosmo and Lady Haskard's agreement.

Thomas Yates was a private in the Royal Sappers and Minerswho arrived in the Islands with Governor Moody in 1842.

Sir Cosmo Haskard was Governor from 1964 to 1970 and led the Falkland Islands through the political crisis of the late 1960's.

Incapacity benefit for civil servants

THE Financial Secretary presented a paper about the new permanent incapacity benefit for civil servants forced to retire through ill health.

This followed a report from the UK Government Actuary's Department which recommended the features to be included in the new benefit arrangements. The new provisions were approved and will be set out in an amendment to Chapter 9 of the Civil Service Man-

agement Code. The papers are being published and can be consulted by anybody who is interested in the detail.

On domestic matters, Executive Council agreed a policy for fees to be paid to the Public Works Department for mapping surveys carried out in connection with land transactions. The details are to be published.

Social club sold and two leases agreed

MR PEARCE said Executive Council had agreed that the club building at Fox Bay Village should be sold to the Southern Cross Social Club for £2000 – thereby guaranteeing the future of Fox Bay social life and, "...many good parties to come."

Executive Council also agreed two leases, that of Sand Bay Abat-

toir to the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) at a peppercorn rent and the granting by FIDC of a licence to the Falkland Islands Meat Company Limited to use and occupy the abattoir; and a Crown Lease to South Atlantic Marine Services Ltd to use the seabed beneath their jetty development.

Stanley Sports Association appeal turned down

THE Stanley Sports Association had appealed to Executive Council against the refusal by the Planning and Building Committee of their application for permission to carry out minor drainage works at Stanley Racecourse.

His Excellency the Governor said while Executive Council turned

down the appeal, members had stated that the Director of Public Works should meet representatives of Stanley Sports Association without further delay with a view to, "...reaching agreement on practical measures to address the current drainage problems on Stanley Racecourse."

Optional discrimination protocol extended to Islands

THE Governor said Executive Council had considered an item of, "particular interest to all women in the Falkland Islands."

Executive Council agreed that the UK's accession to the Optional Protocol to the Convention on the Elimination of all forms of Discrimination against Women should be extended to the Falkland Islands.

The Optional Protocol provides for the right of individual petition to the United Nations by women who believe their rights under the Convention have been violated.

Mining bill will set framework for onshore mining

Council considered and approved the revised draft of the Mining Bill.

The Governor said this is an important piece of legislation which will set out the framework for onshore mining activities.

The Bill is being published and members of the public are invited to comment on the provisions of the Bill prior to its submission to Legislative Council in due course.



Farewell from the Skinstads

IT'S AMAZING how often something unplanned and unexpected can end up being a treasured memory and an unforgettable experience.

Our Falkland visit has been just that and it is with heavy hearts, many pleasant memories and new friends, that we fly out, hopefully

to return some day.

My wife and I and our three sons spent the last 21 happy years in Natal on the East coast of South Africa where I had my own private general practice. When our sons moved off to university in the Cape we suddenly became Darby and Joan, sitting alone, with our sons a thousand miles away. We decided to make a pre retirement move to Cape Town, where we had both lived before. While in Cape Town I accepted an offer from P&O Cruiselines and we have been working and seeing the world together for the last two years. Between four month contracts we manage to see our sons and also do locum work.I was in Cape Town when my wife rang and said, "how about a trip to the Falklands?" as this vacancy had just arisen at the agency. "Lets go for it," I replied and here we are! Since then it's been pure magic and we have been enchanted by these lovely islands, the stark beauty, amazing widlife and the warm hearted, strong, resiliant, proud, independant and friendly people.

We have been welcomed with open arms and overwhelming generosity and hospitality always encountered in remote places where people appreciate and openly care for each other.

My work at the hospital has been extremely pleasant and I am very impressed by the high standard of medicine practiced here. My colleagues are all highly experienced and dedicated to maintaining academic and practical excellence while still all striving to maintain that fast dissappearing "art" of medicine

where patients are seen as people and friends not simply as diseases. statistics and notes on an impersonal computer screen. Believe me the warmth is still here and I consider the islands to be very lucky to have this unique medical service. My "flying doctor" trips have given me a wonderful opportunity to see East and West Falklland from the air and meet some lovely people on the farms. Holding clinics in the back of a land rover or around a kitchen table, warmed by a peat fire, will be an abiding memory.

The pilots I have flown with have been amazing as they negotiate gusty cross winds and freaky weather conditions with quiet con-

fidence.

The battle sites were a stark reminder that man has and always will be, involved in a struggle for land. Fight for what you've got and don't be sold down any river by stealth or deception.

Perhaps the most poignant memory for us will be the sight of happy cheerful children playing in the parks and streets and walking to and from school. The Islands are SAFE. There are very few parts of the world where children and indeed all the citizens are protected and cared for. This is another unique feature that simply must be treasured and maintained - it's rare out there.

I will also carry a lasting memory of the Upland geese strutting aristocratically around Stanley, the males in their white splendour and the more drab females dutifully knowing their place and following their lord and masters. Take note girls! I will also remember the buzzards on a factory shed roof warming themselves next to a chimney in a snow storm.

We'll be back, there's a ten pound sea trout with my name on it swimming around Teal Inlet!

Meeting the demands of the modern fishing fleet

THE FISHING vessel New Polar is the first purpose-built Falklands Loligo trawler.

The New Polar is owned by Polar Limited which is a joint venture company owned 50% by Seaview Limited and 50% by

Polar Limited hosted a reception on board the high technology recently Falkland flagged vessel on Friday evening.

Addressing the group Director of Polar Limited Dick Sawle said "Vigo has been building ships of undoubted excellence for centuries. Companies from around the world have their fleet built and maintained in Vigo. Just as fishing is in the blood of the 'marinero' of Vigo. then so is a welding rod grasped in the hand of its shipyards.

"The New Polar was built as a multi-role vessel to meet the ever more exacting demands of the modern fishing fleet. It must be capable of efficiently finding a variety of species from squid through to icefish, catch them in quantity, process them to the strictest levels of hygiene, be economically competitive, and meet a variety of rigorous tests of environmental compliance, as well as being a safe and healthy vessel on which to live and work. This is a tall order to fulfil. and meeting these specifications has been the aim of the entire team of people involved in the project. There has been no compromise, and the result of the hard work, expertise and diligence can be seen as you tour later through the ves-

has a crew of 56 and was built in Vigo by the Freire shipyard. She has an overall length of 74.5 metres, a 12.5 metre beam and is powered by a 4000 horse power main engine.

The bridge has an amazing amount of radar and sonar fish detecting equipment which makes one wonder if the fish stand the slightest sporting chance, however the squid are still one step ahead of technology with it's almost transparent form making it particularly hard to detect. Mr Garcia-Paz tells us that with exscreens.

The communications systems are plentiful and include a scrambler to find the channels other fishing vessels are working on. New Polar is among the first fifty ships in the world to have satellite Inmarsat F. an extremely fast internet service.

On the factory floor everything is gleaming stainless steel with the system allowing all catch to be sorted and processed simultaneously. The factory works 24 hours a day with three shifts and can freeze up to 60 metric tons daily. Mr Garcia-Paz says, "everything must

processed there is no waste." When asked about weather conditions the ship and factory are able to work in Mr Garcia-Paz told the group, "If you can sail you can fish and process, only when the captain cannot sail does the work

It's never too early to introduce books to children'

TODAY in the UK many children will be attending libraries and events as part of National Bookstart Day.

Bookstart is an exciting scheme offering free books to children and advice to their parents. The scheme was established to encourage parents to share books with children from a very early age.

Bookstart was launched in Birmingham in 1992 with just 300 babies. By March 2000 Bookstart had become the first national bookgifting scheme in the world.

Bookstart is based on the principle that it is never too early to introduce books to babies and children. At a baby's eight month assessment, with the health visitor, parents are given a Bookstart pack, which in-cludes free books, information about local library activities and valuable advice on sharing books.

Camp Education teacher Sue Evans said, "Books are an excellent way of spending a few minutes of quality; quiet time with your children in what can often can be a very busy and hectic day. Sharing books helps to build language skills, give confidence and nurture a long lasting enjoyment of books as well as

helping to prepare for school. Since 1999 Bookstart has given away 3,700,170 books and now distributes books to 92% of children in the UK.

"A similar scheme is to be launched in the Falklands. The librarian, the health visitor and myself have been working together to see how such a scheme would operate throughout the Islands.
"We have affiliat

"We have affiliated to Bookstart in the UK so we can draw on their resources, information and expertise. We are delighted that Beauchene Trading have agreed to sponsor the scheme and recently we took delivery of our first bookbags. In addition to the bookbag to be gifted at the eightmonth check up we have purchased an additional pack to be distributed as part of each two year old check with the health visitor.

Families in the Falklands will very soon start receiving Bookbags The scheme is to be launched on Friday October 15 at 2pm with activities and story sessions in the library. There will be story sessions at 2.15pm and 3pm, an Information Quest for older children and book making activities until about 4pm. Sue said, "Please feel free to join us at any time. If you are not already a member of the library take the opportunity to pop in and see what it offers.

Sue explained how people often have concerns about reading with their child, adding, "...children love looking at pictures and listening to voices. Sharing books with children helps them to understand that we read from left to right, that the pictures help to tell the story and eventually to understand that the squiggles on the page (letters) mean something to the reader.

Babies just love to hear the sound of your voice. If you don't have the confidence to 'read' the story, chat about the pictures, look at simple information books and ask questions about what can be seen in the pictures. Encourage family and friends to also share books.

So, what kind of books are best for babies? Sue says any kind of books for example board books,

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

Penguin News - Voice of the Falklands for 25 years





Penguin News celebrates the Falkland Islands 150 year anniversary









The first copies of Penguin News went on sale twenty five years ago this week.

Islander Graham Bound sensed a gap in the market and decided a new Falkland Islands newspaper was needed. Penguin News was created and has, save for a few rare silences, been with us ever since.

October 3, 1979 saw the publication of the first issue of this paper.

To date, seven different editors have been at the helm of the paper with numerous deputy editors, columnists and typists contributing over the years.

was truly revolutionary. Restricted by lack of funds and time, Graham Bound and Belinda Caminada's efforts in producing the paper had been remarkable. However, armed with funding from the ill fated Seamount company, the new editor, Rory Macleod gave the paper a more professional look as he was able to get Penguin News printed for the very first time. The basic layout of Rory's first edition in 1988 remains the basis of the current set up still used today. Mr MacLeod edited the paper for just under a year and his departure was a result of the problems of Penguin News' parent company, Seamount Ltd.

There followed another break in publication of about eight months before another incarnation, complete with new penguin logo in the banner,

The Falkland Islands Government bought the paper when Seamount Ltd was wound up and installed an editorial board and new editor, Mr Jim Stevens. Since the first issue of this new series on November 3, 1989, Penguin News has been in production con-

Mr Stevens doubled production of the paper, taking it from a fortnightly to a weekly publication.

By now, the *Penguin News* was independent and regulated by the Media Trust and in 1994, former Superintendent of Education and Headmaster of Darwin School, John Fowler became the fifth editor of the paper. Mr Fowler implemented several changes during his two and a half year period in charge. Most significantly, he reintroduced the editorial comment piece to the paper.

Riddell took over in 1996 and also made a number of improvements. Lisa expanded the paper from 12 to 20 pages and began reporting stories from South America. Lisa's time as editor coincided with the controversial Anglo / Argentine Joint Statement in July 1999 which ended the ban on Argentine citizens entering the Islands.

Today the Penguin News is an entirely independent publication, still regulated by the Media Trust, but it now receives no funding from government. Current editor Jenny Cockwell took over in 2003 after being deputy for some three years.

Diversity and versatility have to be the watch words of any Penguin News reporter as the paper has to cover everything from shipping movements and farming issues to Royal visits and high level international diplomacy; but it is precisely this varied mix that makes Penguin News a great place to work, and hopefully a worthwhile read

Former editor Belinda Caminada remembers her Penguin News days busy helping his mother in her shop to produce every edition on the

PEOPLE always asked me when I was preparing to go there and ever since, why I went to the Falklands.

The answer is a mix of curiosity and desperation. I had had a bad couple of years in London, dealing with a series of tragedies and was desperate for an escape. As I was having little luck in London developing my career as a journalist, I resolved to find a newspaper job somewhere, anywhere, abroad. I wrote to almost every English speaking newspaper in the world and waited for the replies, happily envisaging myself working in the Pacific, under a rijian palm tree perhaps, or Aus-

Then I received a letter from Graham Bound which, compared to the cautious possibilities offered by other publications, sounded more like a cry for help. He would be delighted if I could work on the Penguin News. In fact, he wondered, could I run it because he was far too

and he felt strongly that it was an important time for the islands' to have a regular paper.

Looking back, it was exactly the break away I needed, trying to run a newspaper for a community I knew nothing about and having a lot to learn in a short period.

I expected the Falkland Islanders to dismiss me as an impertinent outsider but, despite a pair of old women muttering that I must be an Argentinian spy with that sumame of mine, most people proved tolerant and supportive. I have particularly strong memories of my first home there, renting a room from Malcolm and Susan Binnie whose quiet kindness, humour and dignity I still regard as the best of the Falkland spirit.

Despite my determination, producing the Penguin News single handed often proved a struggle. A struggle to survive on the measly takings but more particularly a struggle antiquidated "roneo" reproduction machine which more often than not required manual cranking of every page and a special skill with elastic bands and string to hold it all together.

On one occasion, I had laboured for the whole day to lay out the front page of an edition only to find, on returning from a tea break, that my cat Gizmo, coming in from the garden, had walked across the master copy - leaving a neat, clear set of paw prints right across the headlines. It was, literally, back to the drawing board and the cat was sacked from his duties as an editorial assistant.

Another vivid memory is the day a telex arrived from the United Nations, asking for 1,000 copies of the latest edition to be rushed to New York so that members could study the latest news ahead of a UN debate on the islands. Due to another crisis of string and rubber bands, I was able to send only ten copies...

I found it could also be a lonely job, having no one with whom to discuss difficult editorial decisions. Nor to share the sometimes acute pressure when, as on a few occasions, I published controversial editorials and articles.

Over all, however, I enjoyed my time in the Falkland Islands and when I left in 1989, I was relieved and encouraged by the fact that, at last, FIDC had agreed to invest in some modern printing equipment without which the paper had no future. I'm delighted but not at all surprised to hear that Penguin News is thriving. I'm sure it continues to provide a vital forum for debate and sharing information which is particularly important in a small community, to counter the distortions of rumour and heresay.

I feel honoured to have been part of the exclusive Penguin News club and wish it all the best for the fu-

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

Bonners Haulage was established in 1985 with two Zetor tractors purchased with a loan from the Falk-land Islands Development Corporation (FIDC).

Paul and his wife Vera were not comfortable with the idea of borrowing money and set to work to repay the loan as quickly as possible

The first contract was carting peat. Stanley's main source of fuel for heating and cooking at that time the tractors were also hired out to various businesses and general haulage work was undertaken.

The loan was repaid in a very short time and Bonners Haulage have gone from strength to strength since. The business now also provides ready mixed concrete to most construction sites, as well as the developed haulage business and the popular car wash facility at Lookout Industrial Estate.

The first refuse collection contract with the Falkland Islands Government was allocated to the Bonner's in 1986.

The work was not as easy as today as most of the rubbish to be carted away was ashes from the peat stoves. This was dusty work in the summer months and very heavy dirty



work in the winter. The ashes and household refuse was not contained in the smart wheelie bins of today but in forty gallon drums with the tops cut out. The drums had to be physically lifted up on to trailers, carted away to the rubbish dump and emptied before being returned to the household. Not work for the faint hearted or weak of back.

Tootie Ford, Jimmy Curtis and Tim McCallum are a familiar sight to the early risers in the Stanley of today as they empty the wheelie bins; West Stanley on Friday and East Stanley on Saturday.

Tootie has made the rounds for more than 18 years and Tim for 10 years, making Jimmy the relative new boy with a mere eight years under his belt. Paul first conceived the idea of introducing wheelie bins to the Falklands when on holiday in the UK and returned with the relevant literature having made some contacts.

Bonners Haulage sourced the refuse collection truck and wheelie bins for the operation and FIG purchased them on their arrival in the Falklands

The plastic wheelie bins took some getting used to for some residents and although alternative metal bins were made available for hot ashes the bin men would on occasion find a partially melted wheelie bin. A former Chief Executive was in fact the first to destroy a bin with his hot ashes which required a replacement.

Paul said he is "very pleased" that Bonners Haulage have been awarded the contract again and that the binmen are happy to continue the work. He said that there has been a high level of interest in the contract since wheelie bins and the refuse truck have been introduced, adding. "there was not a lot of interest when the contract involved lifting forty gallon drums up onto trailers."

For the nineteenth consecutive year Bonners Haulage will provide a service to Stanley households.

Paul said that in the last eighteen years the refuse collection service had never missed a day. "Trescheduled but never cancelled, and then only on one day during the winter of 1995 when the weather was so extreme we had to do the collection during normal working hours and it was a matter of prising the drums from the ground with crow bars."

Warming recipes for the Falkland Islands

Cabbage stir-fry with cumin and bacon

HERE'S one way to get your greens! Good as a light supper, accompanied with a tomato sauce and crusty bread, or as an accompaniment to grilled fish

Ingredients

2 rashers of smoked bacon, chopped

I tablespoon cooking oil I teaspoon cumin seeds

6 oz firm green cabbage, eg savov. shredded knob of butter

I garlic clove crushed (optional) salt and freshly ground black pep-

Method

Heat oil in a frying pan, add bacon and stir fry for three to four minutes, or until golden brown.

Add the cumin seeds and stir fry for a further minute.

Drain any excess fat from the

pan and add the butter.

Add the cabbage, garlic and 2 tablespoons of water.

Simmer for about five minutes moving the cabbage about the pan until the cabbage is just softening.

Season to taste and serve hot.

CUMIN seeds have an earthy aromatic flavour and are widely used

in Middle Eastern cookery. Lightly roasting or frying the seeds before use really enhances their flavour and aroma. This applies to most whole spices.

Although crisp smoked bacon partners cabbage particularly well you can make this dish lower calorie by replacing with turkey rashers or 4 oz button mushrooms sauteed in a teaspoon of olive oil









General Practice FIBS Chart Attack

with Health Visitor, Magaret Grebby Making play educational and fun

DURING those important preschool years, it's through play that children learn and develop. But how can parents make play both education and fun?

It's the quality, not necessarily the quantity, of time you spend with your child that matters

From the minute your child is born, they absorb sights and sounds from the world around them. As they grow, they begin to investigate, experiment and explore. This is how they learn - and play is an important part of this process.

Through play, they will master basic skills; learn expression and communication; develop relationships and gain understanding of the

surrounding world.

One of the most important relationships is of course, that between parent and child. Play has an essential role in the development of this relationship. In the earliest stages of life, the parent is the plaything, stimulating the baby to focus and listen.

As children grow older, play shared with the mother (and indeed other members of the family) encourages cooperation and understanding, so helping to cement relationships.

Active physical play: Even before birth, a baby is active - kicking, turning, using and developing their limbs. This continues and increases after birth when the child will begin to exercise the larger muscles, learning to balance, sit, crawl and eventually run, jump, skip etc.

Manipulative play is the ability to manipulate and have control of the finer muscles of the fingers, hands and wrists. It will also stimulate the development of hand and eye coordination and observation, allowing the child to be both creative and constructive and to use his initiative. Providing your child with building bricks or shape sorters is the ideal way to encourage this type of play.

Dramatic play is important for it allows the child to be imagina-tive, to express himself freely in words and actions and gain understanding of himself in relation to the world around him. Acting out 'dramas' in which he observes everyday activities around him or taking on different character 'roles' are typical of dramatic play.

Social play: Once a child has learned awareness of himself, he needs also to mix sociably with others. This means learning about human relationships, communications, fair play, cooperation, winning or losing. Early social play stems from children playing alongside each other, but separately. They then gradually become aware of the games their neighbours are playing and begin to learn how to

with other children.
Why do children need toys
and games? Well, as we've already stated toys are a vital part of learning. They are a fun way of stimulating and encouraging a child's development; teaching and at the same time keeping him amused

Toys can help a child find out about and develop many different skills - from physical coordination, mobility and agility to the social skills of cooperation, confidence and independence.

Toys not only enable a child to learn but to encourage him to go forward, leading him on to the next stage. There are obvious things to look for when buying or making toys for your child. Safety is, of course, a paramount concern Check that surfaces are smooth, that they are hygienic and easily cleaned; make sure there is nothing that can easily be detached and swallowed; that the toy is unbreakable and fire retardant.

You must also consider which toys would be appropriate at different stages of your child's development. Clearly, all children progress at widely different rates and there can be no hard and fast rules as to which toy will be suitable at any given age.

Birth to three months: Parents should be stimulating the baby with rattles, squeaky toys, chiming toys, these will be the catalysts during the first few weeks. Early physical play will also be stimulated through curiosity to reach the parents and the toys they have. Cot mobiles, activity centres and large beads will enrich and colour the baby's environment.

Three to 12 months: As your baby learn to grasp, squeezes and clutch at everything toys of different shapes, sizes and textures are important. All of these should be suitable for your baby to bite, chew or suck as at this stage everything will be put into the mouth. Later in this period, simple stacking and interlocking toys will encourage hand and eye coordination. At around nine or ten months when your baby learns to pull himself into a sitting position, toys should encourage him to learn, bend and turn, so strengthening the back muscles and improving balance. Roly-poly balls and simple push-along toys are ideal. More solid push toys will be needed as baby takes the first steps.

One to three years: Active physical play continues and improves as children need the opportunity to use their hands and fingers to lift, twist, turn, screw, open and close. All toys with wind-up knobs, handles, cranks and levers are ideal. Musical appreciation will be developing and early, tuneful instruments will be enjoyed. Always remember to take other people's feelings into consideration - banging a drum might seem like sweet music to your child's ears - but to other family members or neighbours it could prove irritating. As the third birthday approaches, your child should be sufficiently advanced to enable him to use large crayons and paint brushes

Three to five years: By this time, your child should be able to handle sturdy ride toys or a first bike. Dramatic play will be developing and children will need props such as dolls, animals and cars. Through acting our dramas with their toys, children gain their first understanding of human relationships and this is the start of early social play. Early social play will be helped by those toys which allow two or more children to play side-by-side e.g. dolls houses and play garages.

Encouraging your child to play doesn't have to mean buying expensive toys. Just use your own creativity and you'll be surprised

at the results! Play ideas

Birth to three months: Hang a plastic coat hanger from a ceiling fixture and tie on different lengths of string or thread. Attach old costume jewellery, kitchen foil, colourful wrapping paper, bright coloured cloth or paper cut into spirals, squares or circles.

Babies at this stage are stimulated by sounds, be they from highpitched squeaky toys or from the general hustle and bustle around the house. Entertain baby with some soothing music. Baby will concentrate on this as you rock him to

Three to 12 months: Dropping and throwing objects is great fun to a baby but can wear out a busy mum. Help yourself by tying an assortment of toys to baby's chair or pram. The baby can then throw and retrieve them. Remember, don't use anything that will splinter or is sharp. Keep the string fairly short and keep an eye on babies to ensure they don't get themselves into any difficulties.

Empty yoghurt pots on string make lovely wiggly snakes. Make a hole in the bottom of the pot, push the piece of string through and then tie a knot on each side of each pot.

One to three years: Children at this stage love to pull anything along behind them. The most successful are those that make a noise. But remember, not too heavy otherwise it will scratch the furniture, and nothing that cracks or splinters because it might harm the child.

At this age waterplay is most successful in the bath. With the floor (and you) well covered and the bath only a third full, splashing, bubble blowing and early attempts at swimming will make a good introduction for your baby and help prevent any fear of water that can sometimes occur at this time. A plastic paddling pool in the garden on sunny days also encourages waterplay and has the advantage of exposing babies to air and sun. It goes without saying that at this early age you never leave your child unattended in the bath.

Wool report - week ending October 4

WOOL prices around the world slipped considerably during the last week.

Analysts were somewhat surprised by the fall as there had been generally good economic news in many markets and in recent European wool shows.

As shown in the attached MPG, most micron categories slipped by between 3 and 10 pence per kilogram clean.

In Australia, 63,850 bales of wool were offered to the trade.

78 % were sold. In New Zealand there was a relatively poor. 69%, clearance of the 20,466 bales





hoped to visit the club occasionally as she missed being there each week



'Historic' constitution reform

FOURTEEN years after recovering democracy Chile managed a political agreement that will open the way to reforming some of the harshest and most controversial aspects of the 1980 Constitution inherited from the military regime of General Pinochet

The three pages document was agreed in the Senate between the ruling coalition, opposition parties and government.

Reforms include eliminating life and nominated Senators, restoring Chilean presidents the power to remove Armed Forces commanders and giving citizenship to the children of Chileans who abode overseas but who have lived in the country for twelve months

This means that among others former president Eduardo Frei must abandon his Senate seat March 11, 2006 as well as nine others mainly retired military commanders.

However there was a limited agreement regarding the binominal electoral system (which ensures the opposition congressional representation). The several articles will be removed from the Constitution and incorporated to the Or-

ganic Constitutional legislation regarding elections, voting and referendums

The two positions regarding the presidential mandate remain unchanged, the ruling coalition favours reducing it to four years and the opposition leaving it at six

"With this meeting we have reached an agreement that can only be described as historic. I believe Chilean democracy has given a significant step forward," said Senate president Hernán Larraín who belongs to the conservative opposi-

Interior Minister emphasized that "from now on we will certainly have a Constitution, which can always be perfected, but from which we will definitively eliminate some issues that impeded essential agreements and consensus for democ-

The document was signed by the Senate's president and vicepresident, the Interior Minister and one Congressman for each of the political parties with Congressional representation.

The reforms had been in the Senate for four years.

Military secrets to be exposed

A group of Chilean Deputies from different political parties have requested President Ricardo Lagos to sponsor a bill repealing the highly secretive Reserved Copper Bill which deals with military financing and procurement

"We're not against the Armed Forces or their modernisation, on the contrary, but the country must know how resources are invested, and it's time to end with secrets. It's imperative to declassify secret legislation from Pinochet's time, said Deputy Juan Burgos, who helped draft the reform bill.

"Given the degree of democratic governance in Chile and the necessity of greater transparency we need new public accountancy norms since this involves \$U\$220million, which remain protected by strict secrecy laws," added Mr. Burgos.

"If needed Congress rules contemplate secret sessions where military budget and procurement can be addressed'

The secret bill 13,196 known in Chile as the Reserved Copper Bill was modified in 1976 establishing that 10% of all overseas sales of Codelco (the government's copper mines and refineries Corporation) must be deposited in the Chilean Central Bank with the purpose of financing the purchase of military equipment.

Payments must be in three equal deposits with a minimum equivalent to \$ US75 million for each service.

Given the booming price of copper this year, (Chile's main export). the Armed Forces are expecting to receive an additional \$ US250 mil-

Gibraltar: Ancram promises end of betrayal

AT THE British Conservative Party conference in Bournemouth Shadow Foreign Secretary, Michael Ancram. made the strongest commitment yet to the people of Gibraltar in his speech saying, "We will end the betrayal and deceit of the last seven

years.
"I am proud that after 300 years the people of Gibraltar unanimously want to stay British. I would never negotiate on sovereignty unless that was the wish of the people of Gibraltar themselves.

'I give them this undertaking. Within a week of winning the election I will formally repudiate the dishonorable agreement reached with Spain by this government to share sovereignty over Gibraltar.

Invasive species pose threat to Islands

THE Falklands needs to close off 'pathways' through which potentially threatening species of plants and animals might enter the Islands, according to a pair of visiting bio-security experts

Bruce Simpson and John Hellstrom of New Zealand company Biosecurity Ltd, have been contracted by the Falkland Islands Government to review the importation and quarantine procedures within the Islands, in relations to the movement of incoming passengers, live animals and animal and plant products, and to recommend how these procedures can be improved.

Mr Hellstrom told *Penguin* News he and his colleague are here to look at the effects of invasive pests and diseases on the economy, the environment and on society.

At present. Mr Hellstrom said, the Falklands are at particular risk from weeds. "As far as agricultural diseases are concerned, they appear to be controlled quite well; there are certainly ways in which

the system could be made more efficient and more targeted. But big threats like foot and mouth disease, which would be devastating to the Falklands, are well covered.

"I think the area where there are much bigger gaps relate to weed species; there is a significant risk of weeds establishing in some parts of the Islands. There have been some thistles emerge recently and calafate; there is potential for more."

He confinued, "When you look at biosecurity you look at how things get in: we call those things pathways. There are about twenty pathways you can identify for the Falklands and about a dozen of those are potential pathways for weeds that are not well closed off at the moment."

Mr Hellstrom said that the level of risk in the Falklands is quite low, due to the climate and the dispersed human and animal populations which combine to make the spread of agricultural diseases more difficult than elsewhere, however the

government needs to ensure that existing and adequate regulations

are more rigorously applied.

Asked if measures such as requiring people to wash their shoes/boots upon arrival in the Falklands would be recommended, Mr Hellstrom said, "It's for the Falkland Islands to decide how far they want to go. There probably is a place for that, particularly with Antarctic boats visiting some of the outlying islands with birds on.

"We had a recent example in New Zealand with one of our very endangered wild parrots - we've only got 85 of them left and they're the only ones in the world - three died because they got infected as a result of dirty footwear.

"That was an accident - the people that were working with them were just going between two ordinary islands and they didn't think there was a problem. In fact they carried infection from one island to another. It's that easy."

Promising oil progress

FALKLAND Oil and Gas Limited (FOGL) says its sale of shares has been "oversubscribed."

On Tuesday FOGL announced that it had received, "...1,294 applications for a total of 17,451,175 Ordinary Shares, representing £6,980,470.

"As a result, the offer is oversubscribed and applications will not all be settled in full, but will be subject to scaling back..."

John Armstrong, Executive Chairman of FOGL, said: "We are delighted with the level of support for our fundraising that has been given by both the retail public and institutions and now look forward to reporting the results of the 2D seismic survey expected in early 2005."

Falkland Islands Holdings plc (FIH) has a 18.06% share in FOGL.

David Hudd, Chairman of FIH yesterday told BBC Breakfast News that FOGL is a "single purpose company" with £12 million to spend on oil exploration to the south of the Falklands.

He added, "If there's anything there, we intend to find it."

Fishing companies in court

CHARGES are to be laid against the owners of the fishing vessels *lbsa* Quinto and Jacqueline next month.

In court on Wednesday, Mr Hugh Ferguson, representing the vessels' owners Quark Fishing Ltd and Freiremar AS, said he required time to receive instructions from his clients.

No charges were read and no pleas taken.

The case was adjourned until November 10.

Also in court on Wednesday was James Alexander of the Joint Communications Unit at Mount Pleasant. He pleaded not guilty to a charge of drink driving.

His case was adjourned until October 27.

HAVING settled back into work, feeling refreshed and rejuvenated from a three week trip to New Zealand. I've been reflecting on the similarities between my two 'homes'

Visiting people, when they hear of my antipodean background, frequently ask incredulously. "You chose the Falklands over New Zealand?

While my initial reaction is to give the questioner a good kick in the teeth for insulting the Falklands. I can understand their admiration for the land of the long white cloud.

New Zealand is a pretty stunning country with everything to offer from pristine beaches with hot white sand to mountain tops with world class ski fields (one of which, by the way, I sampled with startlingly varied levels of success - I still have the bruises to prove it).

But the Falklands too are breathtakingly beautiful and, as we all know,

once you get to know them, they are impossible to resist.

With regards to the populace there are inevitable similarities borne from our colonial roots - the 'she'll be right mate' attitude, a soul-deep resilience and the general belief that the hours spent in one's occupation aren't necessarily the be all and end all of a happy life

Then there is the less attractive similarity between New Zealand and the

Falklands, including an animosity towards new immigrants.

Through the 1990s. New Zealand opened up to foreign investment and immigration from the Far East and the North Island particularly is now one big mixing pot

I, as a superficial visitor, was overwhelmed by the progress these Asian immigrants have induced - a sushi bar on most corners and massage therapists

However this massive influx of newcomers has raised inevitable intolerance and fear amongst the locals. And while most of this racism mainly rears its head on the roads ("bloody Asian drivers") there is a definite tone of resentment towards these newcomers who have supposedly swanned in and taken Kiwi jobs, building mansion-esq houses while they're at it.

New Zealand's experience can be a lesson to us allow external investment but maintain our immigration at a controllable level where newcomers

can be welcomed and embraced, not begrudged

ANOTHER similarity that struck me is that, like Kiwis, we don't explore our


country to the extent that it deserves

A huge proportion of Aucklanders, while they've been to Australia numerous times or even as far away as the United States or Europe. haven't set foot on the South Island - arguably one of the most scenic and moving places on the globe.

We have a similar situation - while many Stanley residents have been to the UK. I'm constantly amazed at how many have never been to the West.

New Zealand's tourist board embarked on an advertising campaign in the 1970s to try and reverse this trend

Perhaps we should subscribe to their slogan: "Don't leave town till you've seen the country." It's surprising, the extent of the beauty on our doorstep

Happy couple prepare for historic Falklands wedding

HISTORY will be made in Stanley next week when Howard Pearce becomes the first Governor to be married in the Falkland Islands.

Mr Pearce says he and his wifeto-be, Miss Caroline Thomée are "re-ally excited" to be getting married in the Falklands. "We decided that having met here, and both loving the Islands, that it would be nice to celebrate our wedding here. It's a special thing to do."

The couple will tie the knot in Christ Church Cathedral on the afternoon of Thursday, October 21

Born and bred in Holland, Miss Thomee's choice of wedding dress reflects her passion for the Falklands. she has made her own dress out of Falklands wool.

She says she first fell in love with the Islands during a visit in 1998 She made a second visit the following year and met Mr Pearce on a flight to Carcass Island during her third visit in 2001. They remained in touch in the following months and Miss Thomée eventually joined Mr Pearce in the Falklands. She says she has an "addiction" for the Falklands and the Islands have borne an interest in wildlife photography in

Continuing the Falklands theme. the couple's wedding rings will feature Falklands gold and Mr Pearce will wear his formal Governor's uni-

form for the special day.

Mr Pearce says, "Inevitably, seating in the Cathedral is rather limited so we anticipate that all the seats will be taken up by people who have been, as it were, explicitly invited to the ceremony. We would like to have just said 'please come' but we decided that that was a little too hit and miss.

"In the hope that it is going to be a nice day, we are arranging for the service itself to be relayed on loud speakers outside the Cathedral and also in the Parish Hall."

The pair will have a Falkland Islands Defence Force guard of honour when they exit the Cathedral and a small naval contingent will provide a second guard, in recognition of October 21 being Trafalgar Day, a group of Brownies will also gather on Whalebone Arch.

Speaking to Penguin News this week, the pair explained why they chose a Thursday afternoon to

marry

Mr Pearce said, "The normal day to get married is a Saturday but we decided not to do that because it would mean the guests who come down on the Lan Chile flight would have had

to have come for two weeks and a lot of people couldn't afford that time. And it so happened also that week the Air Luxor flight leaves on a Saturday

So we decided that it was more sensible to have it on a day nearer

the middle of the week.

Mr Pearce will be supported by his best man, World Wildlife Fund Chief Executive Robert Napier while Miss Thomée's best friend, Locky Kramer will travel from Holland for the occasion.

After having photographs and greeting well wishers on Whalebone Arch, the happy couple will head to the Day Centre in the hospital for a party with members of the community group Acorns, where Miss Thomée often works during the week

She said, "They are my friends and many won't be able to make it to the Town Hall later so we thought we'd have a private party with them."

Next in the day's proceedings is a party in the Town Hall to which anybody who would like to come and join us will be very welcome."

Mr Pearce says. "We would be

delighted to see as many people as possible. Even if they can only come for twenty minutes or so, that would be fine.

The Town Hall is being decorated by Infant and Junior School students. based on a Dutch theme. During the party the newlyweds will not officially greet all their guests; they will simply move around the hall

They will cut their wedding cake during the public party. The cake has been made by a number of people including Marj McPhee, Anita Alazia, Harriet Hall and Karen Barnes and decorated by Connie Stevens and Michele Evans

The party will run from 3.30 -5.30pm. His Excellency says. "We know many people will be at work but we hope that employers will be generous and allow people to take half an hour or so to come along.

Following the Town Hall party, the pair will host a dinner party at Government House, followed by a reception for invited guests. Mr Pearce said, "We can't invite nearly as many people as we would like. The hardest thing when you've got limited space is deciding who to invite."

Miss Thomee added, "There are

just so many lovely people we wanted

Mr Hellstrom says he and his colleagues were surprised not to find a passenger declaration form in place when they arrived in the Falkland Islands, such a form is however soon to be introduced. Mr Hellstrom commented, "I think the really important thing with biosecurity is to help people understand what the risks are to the things they do. Communication and education is very important and is certainly a neglected area here -and in New Zealand.

"I think the most important thing about the passenger declaration is getting people actually think-

ing about the risk.

The difficulty at the moment is that the way the card is written is probably putting too much emphasis on things that aren't that risky. So we're advising on the draft."

Regarding the marine environ-ment, Mr Hellstrom says dirty boats being cleaned in the Falklands presents a big risk and that aquaculture could be put at risk by ballast water brought in by ships

He said this can be managed: "There is an international convention which has been gradually implemented which requires boats to change ballast water before they get to port and I would recommend the Falklands sign up to that part of the treaty and implement it.

He added that the disposal of garbage from boats is not managed .. but it's probably not a major risk because it has to get to pigs before it can cause major problems

such as foot and mouth disease. But it could start other more minor problems and should be better managed.

Mr Hellstrom says he was impressed by the biosecurity measures in place at the military base at Mount Pleasant: "Having looked at what they are doing, there is a lot less risk at the base than there is in the rest of the Islands.

The whole deal up there - the landfill is better there than here (Stanley), the vehicle imports are cleaned, and containers are handled well."

Mr Hellstrom and his colleague met with the Biosecurity Steering Group prior to their departure and are due to produce a paper containing recommendations next month

Pension contributions: how much is enough?

HOW much do we need to save to ensure a comfortable retirement?

That question has been addressed by the Falkland Islands Pension Board, following publicity about the subject in the United Kingdom.

This table (right) was published in the Weekly Telegraph (issue number 686 for the week 15-21 September 2004) accompanied by an article written by Ian Cowie, the paper's Personal Finance Editor, who writes, "Higher taxes, lower investment returns and longer life have created a toxic combination for pension funds."

The current UK pension crisis began on July 2, 1997 when Chancellor Gordon Brown used his first budget to diminish the tax-free status of pension funds by preventing them from claiming back the tax paid on dividend income received from companies in which the pension funds invested.

Alison Inglis of the Falkland Islands Pensions Board explains. "This means that a part of the income earned by the pension funds is retained as tax by the UK Treasury rather than being reinvested for the benefit of the pension scheme members.

"Shortly afterwards stock market returns world-wide began falling. Pension funds are usually invested in stock market investments, and typically hold a diverse range of shares across a number of different industry sectors and geographical areas. As share dividends dropped, so did pension fund income and growth rates.

"Taken together, these two factors mean that pension funds no longer grow as quickly as they used to. Therefore, the individual who wants to save for their retirement needs to pay larger pension contributions today than they would have had to pay a decade ago to produce the same size of pension fund at retirement."

The third factor which makes pensions more expensive to fund today is that average life expectancy has risen from 71 in 1984 to 76 in 2004.

Ms Inglis explains, "When someone retires, they are required by law to use no less than 75% of their pension fund to purchase an annuity which provides a guaranteed income ('pension') for life. The insurance companies which sell the annuities calculate the average life expectancy, and set their annuity rate accordingly."

Since the average life expectancy has risen, the insurance company must drop their annuity rate to cover the extra years of life which the people purchasing the annuities will enjoy. "In other words, if you retired in 1984 with a life expectancy of 71, the annuity rate (the amount which you receive in income for every £1,000 in your pension fund) would have been higher than if you retired in 2004

because the insurance company now has to pay you a pension for an average 16 years instead of 11 years."

What does this mean to you? The table above shows how much money must be saved each month to fund a pension equal to two-thirds of salary at retirement.

Ms Inglis says, "The earlier you start saving, the smaller the monthly payments; or put another way, the earlier you start saving and the more you save, then the greater your pension income in retirement."

Do you have a pension scheme, perhaps through your employment? Are you saving enough? Remember, whatever pension scheme you belong to including FIPS (the Falkland Islands Pensions Scheme), you can make AVCs or Additional Voluntary Contributions each month to help boost your income in retirement. AVCs are tax deductible, up to certain limits.

According to the Weekly Telegraph. Britons have £900 billion saved in pension funds, but that is only £15,000 for every person in the country, nowhere near enough to pay for the extended retirement Britons can now expect.

Ms Inglis comments, "Of course, like all investments, pension fund earnings cannot be guaranteed, and where possible you should take independent financial advice before making big decisions.

"But are you confident that you are saving enough for your retirement, whether through a pension scheme or other investments such as endowment policies, unit trusts, high-interest bank accounts or property?"

She concludes, "If you are concerned that you may not be able to afford a comfortable lifestyle in retirement, then maybe today is the day to start increasing your savings."

Q Under the relevant Ordinance what levels of royalties would be paid to FIG and how does this compare with other oil producing countries?

A Our thanks to Director of Minerals and Agriculture, Mrs Phyl Rendell for providing answers to this series of questions

Falkland Islands legislation provides for a royalty of 9% on exploitation of hydrocarbons. The rate was set in 1995 when the fiscal regime for the Islands was prepared

As there have been no commercial discoveries to date there has not been cause to revise the regime but it still remains attractive for oil companies to invest here particularly with the recent reduction in corporation tax. Many countries are replacing royalties with taxes that relate to profit. For example the United Kingdom abolished royalties eighteen months ago but increased corporation tax to 40%. The USA levy an average 14% royalty but rates are negotiated with companies depending on the financial climate and conditions at well

Under the Ordinance would the FIG have the power to decide how much oil would be produced at any given time?

Under the terms of the Production Licences awarded to oil companies there are no provisions for FIG to decide how much oil would be produced at a given time. Companies will spend millions of dollars in developing a commercial oil or gas field and they will need to plan for a return on their investment if they are to proceed with exploitation.

Would FIG be required to agree the price for which FI oil would be sold?

No. The price at which oil is sold is a matter for the company exploiting the field. If prices fall much below the threshold set by the licensees, production will cease.

Would FIG represent itself in any international organisations where for example production is agreed?

When there is a commercial discovery and a programme for exploitation. Councillors may wish to consider representation on international organisations.

Must any drilling platforms used in the Falklands EEZ conform to British Standards?

FIG has legislation in place that mirrors North Sea health and safety legislation. Rigs working here require a safety case similar to that required to work in the North Sea and FIG contracts the UK Health and Safety Executive to regulate activities in Falkland waters.

O WHICH wild flowers can be picked and which cannot?

A Thanks to Director of Falklands Conservation, Becky Ingham, for the following response.

The legislation in force in the Falkland Islands with

regard to the protection of wildflowers is the Conservation of Wildlife and Nature Ordinance 1999.

This has a list of plants under schedule 3 which cannot be picked and which are fully protected, so should not be cultivated, or seeds collected without a specific permit, which can be obtained through the Environmental Planning Office. These are:

Gibraltar: Spain emphasises dialogue

SPAIN seeks to build a future of shared co-existence with Gibraltar which Gibraltarians are comfortable with.

This was the message from the Spanish Government in its statement to the United Nations Fourth Committee on Decolonisation, delivered last week shortly after the session was addressed by Gibraltar's Chief Minister Peter Caruana and Opposition Leader Joe Bossano.

The Spanish delegate echoed the statements made to the UN General Assembly by Spanish Premier Jose Rodriguez Zapatero who said that Spain continues to have the will to negotiate and to find, .. a solution that benefits the region as a whole and listens to the voice of Gibraltar.

Equally he referred to the article by Spanish Foreign Minister Miguel Angel Moratinos' from last August setting out his govern-ment's approach to the Gibraltar question. This encompassed the creation of "virtuous circles" and the promotion of regional co-operation on the basis that Gibraltar must conform to EU norms. He also highlighted Spain's desire to estabdirect contact with lish Gibraltarians and civil society in Gibraltar.

'It is an obvious fact that a profound negotiation on issues of sovereignty cannot develop adequately in an atmosphere of confrontation, even if this is only because Gibraltarians should participate in these, with the adequate formula, if it is going to have any practical value." The spokesman said that the Spanish Government wants to dedicate the necessary time to this, .. seeking that those things that unite us dominate over the tension of that which separates us or puts us in confrontation.'

However, he added that Spain will nonetheless continue to firmly defend its stand where reason and justice are on its side, although dialogue is preferable to pointless confrontation. The Spanish spokesman went on to reject the idea of referring the issue to the International Court of Justice saying this had been raised and rejected in the 1960s and reiterating the view that the Gibraltar problem is, "...essentially a political problem.

To do otherwise would be to go astray from what should be the main objective of the existing process, he said. That, he said, was precisely what Spain and the United Kingdom were doing, in compliance with the mandate of the Assembly.

Britain, in exercise of the right of reply to the statement of Spain about Gibraltar, said the longstanding position of the British Government on the matter was well-known. UK would continue to stand by its commitment to the people of Gibraltar as enshrined in the preamble of the 1969 constitution of Gibraltar, which required the consent of those people to any change in sovereignty.

Related issues could be resolved only through dialogue, with the aim of a better future for the people of Gibraltar, said the spokesman.

The visit on Tuesday came about after Lady Thatcher mentioned to former Falklands governor Sir Rex Hunt that she was keen to meet with any visiting councillors.

Sir Rex took advantage of the fact that Councillor Norma Edwards was in the United Kingdom and arranged the meeting.

Falkland Islands Government Representative, Ms Sukey Cameron, accompanied Councillor Edwards. She said the pair spent an hour with Lady Thatcher at her house in Belgravia.

She was most interested to hear how the Islands were progressing and was delighted to learn that the population was rising and that young Islanders saw their future there."

On Wednesday Lady Thatcher celebrated her 79th birthday and Ms Cameron presented her with a copy of Kevin Schafer's book Falkland Islands – Between the Wind and the Sea and a card inscribed with best wishes, "... from all her friends in the Falkland Islands.

Lady Thatcher asked that her best wishes be passed on to everyone in the Islands

Argentine-Chilean incident is 'over' say ministers

THE Argentine and Chilean ministers of defence have described the recent joint military exercises in the extreme south border area as "proof of integration" and emphasised that the latest diplomatic incident be-tween both countries, "...belongs to the past."
"This exercise is a proof of inte-

gration for solving problems on both sides of the Andes," said Argentine Defence minister Jose Pampuro on the conclusion of Solidarity 2004, a joint military exercise in the town of 28 de Noviembre.

"The success of the activities deployed by Chilean and Argentine Armed Forces indicate that normality rules our bilateral relations," emphasised Jaime Ravinet, Chile's Defence minister.

The incident is over; now we talk about integration and this exercise is proof of that purpose," added the Argentine official.

Mr Pampuro was referring to the controversy that erupted over a column published last May in El Mercurio by incoming Chilean Foreign Affairs minister Ignacio Walker in which he describes the Peronist party as "fascist" prone and authoritarian, plus saying that President Kirchner's only political asset is his popularity and opinion polls.

In spite of repeated apologies from Mr Walker, who published the article when he was not in the cabi-

net and in the heat of the energy crisis dispute of last winter, the Argentine government has said it remained disappointed with the attitude; Foreign Affairs minister Rafael Bielsa has predicted that president Kirchner will not shake hands with Minister Walker if he effectively keeps to the Chilean official visit agenda next month.
"It's the first time we've seen a

military exercise in support of civilians and this means our defence poli-cies act in harmony," stressed Mr Ravinet.

The exercise simulated the rescue of the inhabitants of Rio Turbio and 28 de Noviembre in the extreme south of Argentina, province of Santa Cruz, next to Chile, after they were completely isolated by snow blizzards. Given access was impossible from the Argentine side but not from Chile, humanitarian assistance was requested in the framework of the natural catastrophes cooperation agreement signed by both countries in 1997.

Operations included parachuting food and medicine, sanitary evacuations and further on helicopter and special vehicle convoys to ensure food and fuel to the Argentine border towns. A Hercules aircraft, three helicopters, six combat vehicles, sanitary units and trucks from transport units were involved in the five day operation. (MP)

Planning and Building Committee news

By Sîan Ferguson A RANGE of new applications have been discussed by the Planning and Building Committee.

At their meeting last week, the Committee granted permission for erection of a conservatory at 15 Watson Way subject to conditions. Laying of sewer pipe for the Falkland Islands Development Corporation at plots 33 and 37 of Lookout Industrial Estate was deferred, but permission was granted for an extension to 7 Ross Road East subject to conditions.

Cable and Wireless received planning permission until October 2005 to site a red telephone box at the Jetty Visitor centre. The application for the erection of a greenhouse at 9 Biggs Road was granted, as was erection of a garage at 19 Biggs Road, but subject to conditions.

Permission was granted for a number of applications at the Canache, including erection of a ramp onto the beach. Permission was also granted to raise the fence height at 17 Callaghan Road and provisions for off-street parking at 5A Ross Road East.

Subject to conditions, erection of a porch onto the existing dwelling at 5A Pioneer Road was granted, as was the erection of a dwelling at 13 Hansen Hill.

Applications from the Falkland Islands Meat Company for creation of a disposal site for abattoir waste was deferred. The Falkland Islands Company was granted planning permission to build a block of four flats on Hebe Street subject to conditions.

And finally, an extension to the house on 1 Short Street was granted subject to conditions.

Portsmouth Harbour declines FIH offer

THE board of Portsmouth Harbour Ferry Company (PHFC) remains at odds with Grant Thornton Corporate Finance, its own financial adviser, in spite of an improved offer for the company from Falkland Islands Holdings (FIH), according to the Financial Times.

The newspaper reports that FIH said it had increased its offer for the ferry operator to £13.3m following talks with Grant Thornton, which had decided to advise the PHFC's board to recommend the revised offer to its shareholders.

But PHFC directors continue to

oppose the terms of the proposed takeover, saying they fell "short of a price that fully reflects the future potential of the company

FIH made its seven-for-one share offer last week, with a part-cash al-ternative of £25 and 850p in loan notes, redeemable over four years. It then agreed to increase the value of the loan notes element in the partcash alternative offer to £10, redeemable over three years

FIH already holds 26.4 per cent of the company, which operates the Gosport Ferry passenger service.

Power to the people - Stanley's station turns 75

A ESSENTIAL SERVICE which lights up our lives at the flick of a switch is celebrating a major anniversary this

In its 75 years of operation, the Stanley Power Station has seen many technological changes; its man power however is remarkably long serving, with a combined total of more than 195 working years accumulated between the current 21 staff

Power Station Manager Glenn Ross has been with the department for 25 years. He started his apprenticeship in 1979 and went on to study Electrical Engineering and Applied Science at Southampton University

Electrical Foreman Dave McGill went to the Power Station for work experience in 1960 and, "... never went back to school.

He completed his five year apprenticeship and then went to South Georgia and the UK before returning to the Islands in 1994 to resume his work at the Power Station

Mechanical Supervisor Mike Pole-Evans and Mechanical Foreman Ken Aldridge have been with the department for 16 and 18 years respectively. mechanics Donald Betts 16 years, and Karl Harris six.

Electricians Severine Betts and Simon Goodwin have both served 16 years. Wayne Clement eight, and Christopher Ford 14: apprentice Marc Finlayson is in his final year of train-


The list of operators also shows a loyal bunch with Ian McLeod and Ian Goss having spent ten and eight years respectively on watch ably assisted by John Coutts. Bruce May. Michael McRae, Keith Boner and Harwoood Peck. Mike Ford has been at the post of Handyman/Storeman for three years.

Bob Gilbert worked at the Power Station through the years of development from 1980 to 2002 and Glenn says. "...much of what is good about the electrical system can be traced back

The Power Station is an incredibly noisy environment to work in and ear defenders are worn at all times. They even have sophisticated sets which enable workers to talk to each other through microphones, however on the day of my visit the sets were not playing the game and left Glenn and I hissing and crackling at each other until







we dived into the quiet of the control room so that the workings of the generators could be explained

The control room is in itself an fascinating area. Mike McRae was monitoring the generators performance at the time and I was fascinated to learn that the electrical power is 'supplied on demand'

As the town's electricity demand increases the watchman increases the output to meet those very needs, almost like 'driving' the generators.

Glenn explained that the Power Station operates, on a daily basis, below 50% capacity (as opposed to 80% in the station's early days).

Power cuts occur about twice a year on average and can be categorised into mechanical failure, electrical fault or operational error, the latter being almost negligible. Glenn said that in his first four years as Station Manager there was only one power cut which happened at a time when both he and Bob Gilbert were on the golf course. Then just as he had been lulled into a false sense of security there were three in a month.

Over the last 75 years the Power Station has taken some massive steps to keep up with the rapid growth and industrial development of Stanley.

Glenn is enthusiastic and justifiably proud of his department. He said fu-ture projects will include new conventional plant, the timing of which will be dependant on load demand.

These include a wind farm at Sand Bay and exhaust heat recovery boilers to heat the Community School and the hospital. These are all, as ever, subject to approvals and capital











Stanley was on September 1,1929, a mere 10 kilowatt (kw) supplied by a Petters diesel one cylinder generator to the Town Hall, Police Station, Police Cottages, Government House and the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital.

In the first month heavy loads were reported in the log book by Tom Hennah and his assistant engineman John Blyth particularly due to a visit of HMS Dragon. The generator was running at 80% capacity, 75 years on the power station uses less than 50% of the available output.

The Power Station has a reputation for employees staying with the department for many years. John Blyth was just sixteen when he helped set up the first power supply and remained with the department until his retirement from his post as assistant Superintendent in 1972. Even then he returned as stand-by Watchkeeper until 1982 spending a total of 53 years at the Power Station.

During that period he witnessed many changes. The first power station was a simple shed close to the beach in front of the old Town Hall. Normal running hours were from 4.30pm until midnight unless there was a dance on in the Town Hall in which case whoever was running the dance would give the Power Station one pound to cover the extra running costs. The generator would also be started on occasion in the morning to run the hospital x-ray machine

There were no electricity meters the population were charged one pound per lamp per year, which was considered quite expensive, so most homes only had lights in the most used rooms.

The electricity supply was extended for all Stanley for the Centenary year of 1933 with output having been increased with the introduction of a Gardener four cylinder diesel and two three cylinder Petter diesel engines. Problems were reported with the exhaust system which kept catching fire and a lack of proper electricity cable. An attempt to make do with telephone cable resulted in the Government House cow receiving an electric shock, not fatal but enough to make it bellow.

During the early part of the second world war the power supply was increased to 24 hours, a necessity with the regulation blackouts. The army located two further generators next to the power station which was now operating from a

merly the EOD office). The power station remained at this site until January 1951 when a new station was built at Magazine Valley, the present site.

The new building was brought on line and commissioned by Ted Gutteridge who had taken over as Superintendent in 1951 and remained in the position until 1973. The maximum capacity of this new station was 600 kilowatts.

In 1961 two Mirlees six cylinder sets were purchased from the Ajax Bay freezer plant at San Carlos increasing the maximum capacity to 850 kw. On May 19, 1973 part of the present power station was officially opened by Governor Gordon Lewis. The station was now under the command of Superintendent Ted Carey who remained in the position until October 1982.

During the Argentine Occupation of 1982 Stanley suffered a lot of damage from shelling in the final days and so did the electrical system. Ted Carey was on watch when a cluster bomb exploded next to the Power Station killing three Argentine soldiers trying to keep warm by the generator's radiators.

It took the electrical staff only two weeks to restore power to the whole of Stanley. Staff worked long into the night making thousands of joins in overhead cables. They quickly run out of the proper connectors and had to splice lines together - every piece of wire no mater how short was used

Following the Argentine surrender The Royal Engineers ran a mobile Power Station behind the West Store to help with the huge increase in electrical load

Les Harris became the fourth Superintendent in October 1982 and in February 1983 a new generator was installed increasing the total capacity to 1616 kw.

There was much work needed on the Stanley system and in 1985 Northern Electrical Industries came to the Islands and installed new cables replacing most of the war damaged system. In 1985 the Civil Commissioner, Rex Hunt opened the new extension to the Power Station which included two new 1000 kw sets and room for two more, the capacity was now 3616 kw.

In 1990 the capacity was increased to the present day 6600



Taking care of your dentures

tures does not mean you can ignore your oral health and hygiene.

It is still important to seek dental services regularly for evaluating the soft tissues and to examine the denture for proper fit, comfort, and

Why should I clean my denture daily?

Daily cleaning of your denture is necessary to prevent build-up of plaque, food, calculus (tartar), and stain which can cause:

problems with appearance or aesthetics

mouth odour

irritation to the tissues under the denture

infections in the mouth

How do I keep my dentures clean?

Rinse the denture under water after meals to remove loose food de-

Brush regularly after each meal, or at least before bed. This removes

the plaque and some stains.

Brush with water, soap, or a mildly abrasive toothpaste, or denture paste. Scouring powders or other abrasive cleaners should not be used because they scratch the denture. Scratches make the denture more susceptible to collecting debris,

plaque and stain. You can use a denture brush or a regular soft toothbrush to clean the denture, but use a separate brush for cleaning any natural teeth you have.

Make sure you reach all areas of the denture.

The denture can be soaked in a solvent or a detergent with a chemical action that removes or loosens light stains and deposits. Rinse the denture with water afterwards. Chemical immersions can be carried out daily or several times a week.

Ultrasonic cleaning is carried out during a dental appointment to remove heavy stain and calculus (tar-

The most effective way to keep your dentures clean is by daily brushing, in combination with soaking the dentures in a chemical solution.

Some helpful hints:

When brushing the appliance do not hold it firmly or with pressure as this can break the denture.

Clean the denture over a sink half filled with water and place a towel in the sink to act as a cushion

in case the denture should drop.

Do not soak or rinse the denture in hot water, this can distort the shape and fit of the denture.

Never scrape the denture with sharp instruments in an attempt to remove hard deposits. Instead, take it to a dental professional for them to remove the deposits.

Never use a hard bristled brush to clean the denture. This can scratch the denture.

Make sure to leave your denture out overnight, or out of the mouth for a period of six to eight hours daily. Wearing them at all times without allowing your gums a chance 'to breathe", can result in infections of the soft tissues under the denture.

When your dentures are not in your mouth, keep them in water or denture solutions. They need to be kept in a wet environment in order to maintain the proper fit.

Your gums are important too. Not only do your dentures need maintenance, but care also needs to be given to the tissues under your denture. The gums should be cleaned daily with a soft toothbrush or a washcloth. This removes the plaque and debris on the gums. It also massages and stimulates circulation of tissues.

Massage your gums by placing the thumb and index finger over the ridge and use a "press-and-release" stroke.

How do I know my dentures no longer fit?

With age, the jaw bones slowly change. Therefore, dentures that once fit no longer do. You may need to have your dentures re-adjusted or you may need to have a new denture made. If you encounter any of these problems, see your dental professional: problems chewing food with dentures, chronic cheek biting, difficulty in speech, red and inflamed tissues, discomfort with wearing the denture or cracked corners of your mouth.

Natural teeth

Remember to brush any remaining natural teeth - it is very important to keep them free of plaque.

Tooth brushing will remove dental plaque and other debris from your teeth. Plaque plays a primary role in oral disease such as tooth decay and gum disease. The best way to remove plaque from the tooth surface on a daily home care basis is through toothbrushing and some form of "be-

tween the teeth" cleaning.
The following toothbrush technique is commonly recommended by dental hygienists.

Use a soft bristled brush (synthetic bristles preferably because natural bristles tend to harbour the oral bacteria as the bristles are more porous). Be sure it is the right size (generally smaller is better than larger).

Place the bristles at a 45 degree angle to the teeth. Slide the tips of the brush under the gums.

Jiggle the bristles very gently so that any plaque growing under the gum will be removed.

· Be sure to brush the outside, the tongue side and the chewing surfaces of your teeth.

For the front teeth, brush the inside surfaces of the upper and lower jaws by tilting the brush vertically and making several up and down strokes with the front part of the brush over the teeth and gum tis-

Brushing your tongue will help freshen your breath. Debris and bacteria can collect on your tongue and cause bad breath.

Your toothbrush will only clean one or two teeth at a time. Change its position to properly clean each tooth.

To prevent plaque damage, be sure to brush at least once every day, preferably at bedtime. Adding a brush time after breakfast increases your chances of thorough daily plaque removal.


Don't rush your brush. A thorough brushing should take at least 3 minutes

Brushing the teeth too vigorously or using a hard bristled toothbrush causes the gums to recede and exposes root surfaces. It also wears down the tooth structure. Both of these conditions can lead to tooth sensitivity.

A pea-sized amount of fluoridated toothpaste is all you need, should you choose to use a toothpaste.

Replace your brush when the bristles begin to spread. A worn out toothbrush will not properly clean your teeth.

Wool report - week ending October 8

by Neil Judd, Wool Advisor, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices in New Zealand and Australia were reported down mar-ginally last week, but up fractionally in South Africa. However when prices were expressed in terms of pence per kilogram clean, it became obvious that prices actually firmed quite significantly (due to appreciation of the Australian and New Zealand dollar relative to the UK pound sterling).

As shown in the attached MPG most micron categories less than 25 micron gained in excess of 6 p/kg clean while broader fleece wool lots were generally either firm or up by a few p/kg clean.

In Australia, 44,232 bales of wool were offered to the trade, 86.6 % were sold. In New Zealand, for the second week running, there was a relatively poor, 69%, clearance of the 6,653 bales on offer while in South Africa 95% of the 8,973 bales on offer were purchased by the trade.

Oil price surge impacts world growth

OIL workers strike in Nigeria and the latest report from the International Energy Agency, IEA, have helped oil prices break new records this Tuesday according to analysts in New York where Texas light crude was selling at over 54 US dollars the barrel. In London North Sea Brent reached 51.50 US dol-

The report from Paris based IEA, which advises 26 industrialized countries in energy affairs, indicates that crude demand is growing faster than originally forecasted

However the same report warns that crude high prices have began to decelerate world growth and encourage China to improve energy performance

According to IEA, crude demand in 2004 experienced the highest jump in 24 years with an increase of 2.71 million barrels per day. But in 2005 demand is forecasted to expand 1.45 million bpd with a total world consumption of 83.85 million bpd.

"Reduction reflects lower growth prospects in 2005 and the impact of crude high prices on demand and the economy overall."

This year the oil price surge was speared by the growing demand from China

But the surge is having its impact in China: last August demand decelerated to 6% compared to the 12% of July and 25% of the second quarter

IEA forecasts that Chinese demand expansion in 2005 will drop to 360,000 bpd, equivalent to

China is the world's second crude importer behind United States

According to the International Monetary Fund, World Economic Outlook, a sustained rise of 5 US dollars per barrel could impact world growth by 0.3%, particularly in those countries where domestic demand is weak and net importers that are already highly indebted.

The world economy is currently growing at an annual 5%, the highest in three decades, mainly because of China and the US performance, but according to IMF will drop next year to 4.3% from an originally estimated 4.6% because of rising oil prices.

Honduras declared free of land mines

THE Assistance Program for Removing Mines in Central America. (PADCA), finished last Friday clearing Honduran territory from dangerous war devices left over from the eighties in the midst of the Cold War.

Honduran civil and military officials, diplomats and Organization of American States representative in Honduras Karen Reves, were all present for the ceremony celebrated the country's capital. Tegucigalpa.

The organisation responsible for the Mine-Removal Program, created in 1994, was the OAS Inter-American Defense Board with military cooperation from the

Latinamerican continent.

Mine removal and elimination of the deadly antipersonnel artefacts took place along the border areas of the country, in the northern region of Naco, the western region of Cerro Montecristo. Choluteca in the south and El Paraiso in the west.

The task included clearing lethal devices from 1.479 square kilometres of farmland, benefiting 67,000 peasant families who live from agriculture. Honduran authorities said the total eliminated was 2.191 landmines, 214 explosives. 60,521 items of war surplus materials and undeclared antipersonnel mines.

Chile-Argentina relation is 'more than gas'

CHILEAN President Ricardo Lagos strongly stated that relations with Argentina involve, "more than gas and more than a newspaper column" and they are "the exact level where they must be

Mr Lagos who is currently on a state visit to Europe was referring to the controversy triggered following the recent naming of Ignacio Walker as his Foreign Affairs minister.

Argentina reacted negatively to Mr Walker's designation because of a

column published last May in El Mercurio titled "The gas crisis" where he is critical of the ruling Peronist Party and of President Kirchner.

But President Lagos has put an end to the controversy,



Islands celebrate as Governor says 'I do'

HISTORY was made yesterday when the Governor of the Falkland Islands married his Dutch partner in a Stanley

wedding ceremony.

As they took their marriage vows in Christ Church Cathedral in Stanley, the world's most southerly cathedral, His Excellency Mr Floward Pearce CVO, 55, and Miss Caroline Thomée, 38, made history, this being the first time a representative of Her Majesty the Queen has chosen to wed in the Falkland Islands.

Despite a blustery wind, a large gathering assembled at the Cathedral to witness the occasion. Such was the level of public interest in the event, live coverage was broadcast on television by KTV, webcam by Cable and Wireless and nation-wide radio by the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station. Cable and Wireless later reported that internet usage went to its "full capacity" both locally and internationally during the wedding

All school children in the Falklands were given the day off school in recognition of the event.

His Excellency chose to marry in his official Governor's uniform while his Dutch bride looked radiant in a felted dress of Falklands wool. The full length dress featured a subtle pattern of spring colours.

Best man was the groom's friend. Mr Robert Napier, Chief Executive of the World Wildlife Fund and the bride was supported by her friend, Ms Loeky Kramer.

In recognition of the bride's



roots, Reverend Paul Sweeting made the closing prayer in both English

A cheer went up from the crowd as the happy couple emerged from the Cathedral, greeted by a guard of honour from the Falkland Islands Defence Force, bathed in spring sunshine and accompanied by the joyous pealing of the church bells Members of the Brownies later sealed the event with three cheers for the couple.

The newlyweds, both self-con-

fessed Falklands fanatics ensured the public at large was included in their big day.

After visiting community group Acorns at the hospital for a party, they hosted a two hour celebration in the Town Hall, to which all members of the community were invited, before holding a reception at Government House later in the evening.

MPs to visit

FOUR United Kingdom politicians are to visit next month.

Dari Taylor MP (Labour), Alun Cairns AM (Conservative), Alan Campbell MP (Labour) and Vera Baird MP (Labour) will be in the Islands from November 19 - 25.


The group will meet with representatives of both the public and private sectors and will spend time in Stanley and Camp. They will be accompanied by Falkland Islands Government Representative in the UK, Miss Sukey Cameron.

Miss Cameron says the value of such visits should not be underestimated: "Members not only get to see the Islands for themselves but, more importantly, meet Islanders and become fully appraised of our views and aspirations. When they return they pass on their impressions to their colleagues and are able to assist us in Parliament on any matters that may arise."

The UK Parliament has the final say in Falklands external matters (Foreign Affairs and Defence) and Miss Cameron says it is the Falklands' responsibility to, "...ensure that Members of Parliament are well briefed on Falkland Islands issues.

"To do this we undertake a rolling programme of meeting those Members who have not been involved with the Falklands before; take stands at the annual Party Conferences; act as Secretariat to the UK Falkland Islands All Party Group and organise visits to the Islands."

The Government has tried to make the MP visits an annual fixture since 1989 however Miss Cameron says, "...in some cases events conspire against us."

OUR 'Your Questions Answered' column has proven highly popular and readers will have noticed it is being utilised by the public more and more each month.

However, over recent weeks, some of these 'questions' have turned more into comment and this is something we're going to crack down on. After all, if you want to express an opinion, that's what the letters page is for.

I decided not to submit one question last week and I'd like to explain what happened; I believe it highlights why it is important to draw the line between query and commentary.

The question, which contained far more comment than query, stated that certain individuals can enjoy a drink in the pubs, members-only clubs or at cocktail parties, then drive their vehicles home with immunity, without fear of being nabbed by the police. In effect, the person said, the police "turn a blind eye". They were clearly very angry at this "injustice".

This belief that the police sometimes look the other way seems to be rather widespread and is perhaps a by-product of those legendary skirmishes from the mid-80s (previous to the introduction of drink driving legislation), more often than not involving a senior member of the establishment, a Series II Land Rover, a garden shed and someone's pet sheep.

As part of my job, I often attend receptions and cocktail parties and I can honestly say that never have I witnessed anyone staggering out to their car at the end of the night after downing gin like there's no tomorrow nor have I observed the suggested arrogance of anyone boasting they are free to do as they wish, regardless of the law.

If anything, people seem to be slightly paranoid about having even a small glass of wine during an evening out, for fear of a drink driving conviction.

But despite my personal experience, this was a worrying allegation and one which I took seriously.

I invited the questioner to provide facts behind the claim of preferential treatment - names, dates, everything - because I was more than willing to investigate it fully. However, the facts were not forthcoming.

When I told the person I would need this information if I was to avoid being on the sharp end of any legal action (the law protects the reputation of individuals from unjustified attack and some members of the police force could certainly deem such an allegation as unjustified) the response was one which I hear all too often: "As no names have been mentioned no one can be libel for anything."

Just imagine how much more fun my job would be, were this true!

In the end I chose not to send the question off to the Chief of Police; instead I called him and suggested it was time this type of accusation was addressed.

He agreed and as a result we have the article (right). I hope it addresses the concerns my correspondent had.

And to our readers, I would urge you to continue sending in your questions. But please keep them as just that - questions.

Drink driving: 'one rule for all'

THE police do not have an "unspoken rule" in deciding who to stop for suspected drink driving, the Chief Police Officer says.

According to Superintendent Dave Morris there is "one rule for everybody" and suspects are stopped, "..regardless of who they are or where they have been."

Responding to a query from Penguin News, Mr Morris said rumours that certain members of the public are allowed by the police to drink and drive is untrue. When asked why he thought this misconception exists, he responded, "I have no idea why this myth is so widespread - possibly as a result of sour grapes."

It is an offence to drive or attempt to drive a motor vehicle on a road or in a public place when unfit through drink or drugs.

The legal limit is 35 micrograms of alcohol in 100 millilitres of breath. A drink driving conviction results in a minimum mandatory 12-month driving disqualification and a fine.

When it comes to stopping suspected drink drivers. Superintendent Morris said there is one rule for everybody: "All suspects are stopped regardless of who they are or where they have been."

He continued, "When the officers stop suspected vehicles at night quite often they have no idea who the driver is until the vehicle has been stopped."

Superintendent Morris said that, as there is no random breath testing carried out in the Islands, "... we don't automatically stop drivers because they have been seen leaving a club, pub or cocktail party...the officer must have reasonable cause.

"You can not assume that a person is driving with alcohol in his body simply because they are seen leaving licensed premises or cocktail parties, they may have been drinking soft drinks as a lot of people do these days."

He added, "We have always applied one rule for everyone, regardless of who they are, and this will continue."

A police officer in uniform can require a person to provide a specimen of breath for a breath test if he has reasonable cause to suspect

- a) That a person driving or attempting to drive or is in charge of a motor vehicle on a road or other public place has alcohol in his body or has committed a traffic offence whilst the vehicle was in motion; or
- b) That a person has been driving or attempting to drive or been in charge of a motor vehicle on a road or in a public place with alcohol in his body and that person still has alcohol in his body; or
- c) That a person has been driving or attempting to drive or been in charge of a motor vehicle on a road or other public place and has committed a traffic offence whilst the vehicle was in motion.

It is also an offence for a person to fall to supply an adequate sample of breath for analysis "without reasonable excuse".

Commonwealth seminar: young Islanders to attend

TWO young Falklands women have been invited to attend a Commonwealth seminar in London next month.

The two, Donna Triggs and Justine Goss, were the Falklands representatives at the Commonwealth Day celebrations in March.

Donna says the follow up seminar will involve discussions about a variety of subjects ranging from Commonwealth Human Rights to the work of the political affairs division of the Commonwealth Secretariat.

Justine will travel to the seminar from Chichester where she attends college, while Donna will take time from her job in Stanley's Treasury and fly to the UK.

Clerk of Councils, Ms Claudette Anderson, said Donna's interest in attending was so great that she was willingly going to pay her own airfare to do so. However, councillors were "impressed with her interest and determination to attend" and approved the funding for half of her airfare.

O SOME time ago I read in Penguin News about the population explosion at Goose Green and how a lot of money was being spent out there, such as all the houses being improved for all the extra people, opening an internet cafe, etc.

To my knowledge a lot of people have now left the farm and I believe there is only something like twenty people now which in-

cludes five children.

Why then has £50,000 been set aside for further development? How many hours a week is the Internet Cafe in opera-

A Chief Executive Chris Simpkins commented, "The population of Goose Green is currently 26. It can, and does, change fairly frequently as families, with or without children. move in and out.

"So far as the £50k is concerned - it was originally earmarked to develop basic infrastructure to enable some building plots to be offered for sale following completion of im-provements to the occupied dwell-

ings.
"Falklands Landholdings (FLH) gave further consideration to whether this really made sense in light of the fact that there are empty dwellings in the settlement that are no longer required by the business. The Board decided not to commit the expenditure and to invite offers for the purchase of two of the dwellings. There is evidence of demand.
"At Legislative Council on July

30, the Chairman of FLH, Richard Cockwell, advised that there is no intention of using the £50k for agricultural purposes.

The caretaker of the Internet Cafe, Anika Clarke, said a total of 97 hours internet time has been logged in the last year. She added that the facility is used for off-line and training work, the hours of which cannot realistically be calculated.

Q DOES the public get any feedback about the police force's 'clear-up rate'? The paper has reported the stripping of a vehi-cle on the MPA road, vandalism in the Leisure Centre, a letter has asked for any news of the theft of four tyres, and I know of other thefts, but I never see any reports of criminals caught. Are they?

A Chief Police Officer Dave Morris replied, 'There is a report published every year to advise the general public of the force's clear up rate, a copy is sent to the public library

"Last year the detection rate was 94% and the crime figures were reduced. The court news goes out in the Penguin News and on FIBS after every session giving the public in-formation on the criminals caught

and sentences.
"The theft of four tyres is an ongoing investigation so I can't comment on that and I can't possibly comment on the other thefts unless I know what they are

O SOME time ago a dog became

loose inside a FIGAS aircraft due to its great distress and obviously endangered the flight. Surely animals of a nervous disposition should be sedated for their own comfort and the safety of the passengers.

What are the regulations re-arding transport of livestock on garding transpo. FIGAS aircraft?

A Air Service (FIGAS) General Manager, Fraser Wallace provided the following answer.

Carriage of animals, and dogs in particular, is covered by the FIGAS Operations Manual and requires a crate or similar container for the

carriage of animals.

This container must be of sound construction, with adequate ventilation, and be constructed in a manner to prevent soiling of the aircraft floor or articles adjacent to the container. The consignee, strictly speaking, is responsible for the provision of this container but FIGAS do provide standard commercial dog boxes for the purpose.

That the dog managed to escape from its box is an extraordinary occurrence. But we must remember that it was a singularly isolated incident; we wished to avoid an impractical knee-jerk reaction of imposing inappropriate measures relating to future carriage of animals and have therefore not introduced a requirement for all animals to be sedated

However, if the owner or handler, who is clearly best placed to judge their animals's character, believes that a particular animal is of a temperament whereby sedation would be beneficial, they should make arrangements with the veterinary authorities, before requesting FIGAS to transport the dog. (Additionally,

legislation for the carriage of dogs by FIGAS provides a requirement for fasting and bathing of the animal and proof of hydatid dosing, all of which might be of significance to human

health if neglected.)


Notwithstanding the above, mention must be made of the fact that individual aircraft commanders are ultimately responsible for the safety of the flight and can therefore exercise wide ranging discretion in refusing carriage of any person, animal or material which might clearly, or inconceivably, constitute a hazard to safety or comfort

In closing, it should be mentioned that although the dog escaped, the flight was not endangered. (After an initial exploration of the front of the aircraft the dog retreated to the rear of the aircraft where it remained

throughout)

The flight was aborted because a) the dog, in escaping had injured itself and was therefore in need of veterinary attention and b) the interior of the aircraft and its seats were liberally splattered with blood which had to be cleaned off the furnishings before passenger service could be resumed.

II IS with regret that we report the death of Mr Maurice Smith who died in Fernedown, Dorset on October 11, 2004

Maurice arrived in the Falklands with his wife Andi in 1949 to work for the then fledgling Falkland Islands Air Service as maintenance engineer.

Shortly afterwards he was joined by another ex RAF engineer, Dave Jones and the two were prominent amongst those who pioneered modern aviation in the Falkland Islands

In the early 1950's the first of the familiar De Havilland Beavers arrived in the Falkland Islands to replace the Austers and Norseman aircraft. Maurice and Dave carried out the maintenance on these aircraft for nearly 20 years under what must have been fairly difficult circumstances considering the

MacLeod's 'shock' value progressed PN

SORRY to have missed your anniversary deadline but I was away for some hard-carned time off

It seems like a lifetime ago since I was editor of Penguin News. I cannot believe it was 16 years ago I headed south to Stanley on what was to be an incredible adventure. In truth I suppose I should admit I was illprepared to be an editor of a publication which, in importance, particularly at that time, punched above its weight. It still does, and it amazes me so many people around the world know of the Penguin News and have seen a copy at some stage.

So what of my ever-so-brief tenure of the editorship of *Penguin* News? Before I go any further, let me say that there is never a week goes by that I don't think about the Falklands in some shape or form The place has a habit of getting under your skin and never leaving you. It was an exciting time for the islands 1988-89 with so much change, development and upheaval going on. but I can truly say that it was one of the most exciting times in my life which I enjoyed immensely and which gave me a few life lessons along the way

To fellow Scots I describe the islands at that time as Shetland without the red tape...the emphasis was to make things happen and not to allow overbearing bureaucracy get in the way of good ideas. However, with that approach comes an element of risk and that was never better displayed than with the collapse of Seamount which was the parent company of Penguin News Ltd.

Having been an investigative reporter for seven years before this I continued to work on the basis of rattling cages and seeing what fell out of the bottom. But really this post required a little more subtlety and maturity than I was probably able to bring at that stage of my own

personal, and within my career, development. However, things were not helped with the collapse of the parent company, Seamount, within weeks of arrival and much of the new gear and supplies being held on board one of their vessels which was stuck in Falmouth Sound with several writs attached to her foremast!

I take comfort in the fact that many people I have spoken to since have said that at least the shock value of some of my stories and methods did make many realise that they were expected to be accountable and that there was a paper which would not just be an information sheet for government, but also a forum for healthy debate and venting of any frustrations from islanders and interested on-lookers

There is an endless list of people who made things possible during my stay and I can't thank all of them enough. I just hope that I managed to establish something that was a little brash, did not allow "institutions" to rest on their laurels, made islanders feel they had somewhere to put their arguments or voice opinions. and which was worth a read. I look at it now and cringe a little at the naivety of the content and the lack of shape or polish to the presentation. I have since gone on to work on large regional and national titles elsewhere and be an editor and have learnt so much more, but will always owe a debt of gratitude to the PN for giving me that first overview of a complete paper.

I am now Chief Press Officer at the Scottish Executive, the civil servant institution which serves the government in Scotland, and have recently moved from looking after the Environment and Rural minister to a new post reporting direct to the Scottish Cabinet and dealing with communications in emergency situations in light of the heightened state of national security from the terrorist threat. I made the move to government after being president of the National Union of Journalist in the UK.

I have kept an eye on developments in the Falklands, even occasionally putting pen to paper when I see some twit pontificating on the islands when they have absolutely no understanding of the people, the place, or the circumstances. The Falklands are a very special place with a fine people who are well capable of running their own affairs. It was my privilege to be able to spend time amongst them and to attempt to produce a paper which maybe represented some of their views and items they wished to see aired. It has been immensely pleasing to see the paper continue with all the improvements in presentation and standard over the years. It is frightening to see pictures of folk now who were just small children when I was there and it just proves that time marches on. I had hoped to return to the islands long before now, but it has not been and I still look forward to one day coming back.

Thoughts of the islands and the islanders still leaves me with a warm glow. I have always said that if I had not had to return to the UK I would probably never have left or have spent a much longer time there. To all I knew there, a heartfelt "Hi Chey!" and thank you for all the outstanding memories and experiences I have from my time there. Whilst this may be so in the UK I'm not so sure that this is in fact required by Falklands law. On the other hand it may be a condition of the FIPS but not everyone is a contributor.

The Cable and Wireless International Retirement Benefit Fund, which due to its global deployment and hence inability to accommodate a multiplicity of national arrangements, pays out the accumulated benefit in cash US\$. So far it has been the choice of the beneficiary what they do with it.

Kids get hooked on books | Developing national standards

IN THE past Plant Operators with CSCS cards issued by the Construction Industry Training Board (CITB) for the operation of various categories of plant were able to simply apply to renew their cards when they expired.

However, with effect from January I, 2004, CITB introduced a new scheme under which plant operators have to complete a logbook to show that they have undertaken a minimum of 300 hours on each category of plant over a five year period (or pro rata if their cards expire before the end of this five year period) in order to renew their cards.

Some Plant Operators in the Falkland Islands currently have to operate as many as eight or nine different categories of plant. Training and Development Manager Eileen Davies said it would not be practicable and probably not possible for operators to complete three hundred hours on so many different types of plant over a five year period

This led the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) to look at an alternative scheme in which their employees could demonstrate their competence in the operation of various categories of plant without compromising safety standards and satisfying the requirements of the police and insurance companies

Mrs Davies said "It was decided that the best way forward would be to develop our own national standards for the operation of plant, which would reflect best practice in the rest of the world and which would ensure high standards of safety.

"This new system would be carefully structured so that local validators, approved by the CITB, could validate logbooks. These would also be endorsed by qualified local people who have a vast amount of experience in the relevant categories of plant (e.g. PWD

Foremen). Plant Operators would also be required to sit CITB Health and Safety tests on-line. These tests have been run at the Training Centre over the past year.

Mrs Davies explained that it was decided that if the Falkland Islands were to have their own national standards, there would also need to be, "...a structured programme of training for all new plant operators to ensure that they were properly trained and assessed against these standards.

"With this aim in mind, two companies with the relevant expertise and experience, one in the United Kingdom and one in Australia, were invited to submit quotations for the provision of a set of suitable national standards and for the provision of a structured training programme, which could be delivered by trained local staff in the future. This would eliminate the need to rely on external trainers in the future, which has always been very costly.

The Falkland Islands Government is currently negotiating a deal with a very reputable training establishment in Australia. Mrs Davies said it is envisaged that the work to set up some national standards and introduce a local training programme will be. "...underway in the very near future, certainly within the next four months.

Although this new system will not result in operators holding accredited CITB cards, it is hoped that any Plant Operators who leave the Falkland Islands in future to work elsewhere, will be able to prove their competence by producing logbooks and certification which show that they have followed. "... a robust programme of training and assessment measured against a high set of standards which are comparable to standards in other countries such as the United Kingdom, Australia and New Zealand.'

Acquiring knowledge to impart to others

Tour guides, both new and experienced, complete a week of intensive learning

"BEING a sponge" for a week is how one person described their experience on the latest Tour Guide's Course.

-The five day course required all participants to absorb a huge amount of information

Of the 25 'sponges' on the course. 16 were first-timers wishing to gain the accreditation as a Registered Tour Guide and seven 'refreshers'. This latter group could be described as gluttons for punishment, as they already have The Badge', having passed the course in previous years, but opted to update themselves by attending this year's course.

It was a great group to work with," says Connie Stevens. Director of Tourism for the Falkland Islands Tourist Board, "comprising of Falkland Islanders, people who have settled and lived here for many years and a few very recent newcomers to the Islands.

"Local knowledge was a great asset and their contribution to the group was very welcome. Newcomers however reminded everyone not to take anything for granted and to ook at things anew and to observe from a visitors perspective

It was an intensive week, Mrs. Stevens said, with speakers covering some heavy weight subjects, "...including government and the economy; minerals: SOLAS (new port security systems); and geology.

We also covered subjects such as the supply chain and horticulture. where we learned that the Falkland Islands is considered to be the third highest in the world, in terms of quality of fresh produce supplied to cruise ships! That was news to everyone and something that will be communicated to the cruise ship passengers when they arrive - that they can look forward to their supper as they sail out from Stanley, as they will be enjoying some top quality produce. Did you know that Stanley

Growers produces 60,000 heads of lettuce per annum, and 25 tons of Throughout the week, the morn-

ings were all classroom-based at the Chamber of Commerce, with intensive sessions of information provision, whilst the afternoons were mostly field trips, encompassing some practical sessions to deliver the information in a different environment. A trip was made to Gypsy Cove, guided by an experienced warden at the site and various places were visited around the Stanley area.

One afternoon involved a coach tour of Stanley, with archivist Jane Cameron acting as the on-board instructor, narrating and delivering information on the historic buildings as we travelled, with stops at relevant places to cover subjects in more detail - such as the Cathedral, where the Reverend Paul Sweeting provided more specific information and at the Dockyard, where Jane gave everyone a detailed brief of the buildings and history of the area

Sue Gyford, one of the course participants, commented that she found the entire course incredibly interesting, and was. " absolutely exhausted at the end of it." Sue found the afternoon field trips were the. perfect antidote to the intensive morning classroom sessions, espe-

cially the historic buildings tour with Jane, which was particularly good and a tour in itself

Sally Blake, who was on the course for the first time, said, "...it was most informative. I have lived here all my life and I learned a whole host of new things. There is an incredible amount to learn.

Similarly, Patrick Watts, said that he found the course, "__informative, enlightening and it certainly helped to educate everyone in terms of their approach to tourists." Patrick also added that it was, "... quite hard work, but fun at times too." Leona Vidal-

Roberts, Manager of the Museum. was among the 'local' faces and said that she. "-would recommend that everybody involved in Tourism should go on the course

A newer face to the Islands. Richard Morrison's immediate reaction when asked about his experience of the course was, "Oh, my head," but he did follow this up by saving that he learned a huge amount and particularly enjoyed going out to visit

As part of his practical assessment, Richard opted to take the assessors and his peers on a walking tour of Stanley, after which he said that, "...he hadn't realised how narrow the footpath was and how dangerous it can be with people stepping off on to the road. Whilst he was in 'full flow' outside Police Cottages (aka Constable Row), an astute roving reporter from Penguin News dashed out with the camera, to take a photograph of the little group, huddled on the side of the road, being led by Richard - who said later that he hadn't realised. " how difficult it is. walking and talking in the wind. leading a group of tourists."

The walking, vehicle and coach tours, were the source of amusement to some passers-by who seemed bewildered by the sight of these groups of people being led by their tour guides, two weeks in advance of the first cruise ship due

The seven refreshers - 'second time rounders' are already in possession of the FITB Tour Guides Badge (and proud of it) but they all wanted to update themselves and attended the course for the entire week. Barbara Curtis said, "... the course was really useful. Information changes and new things come up such as SOLAS, so it is important to attend 'refreshers', to ensure that the information you are giving to a tourist is correct and up-to-date.

Another 'refresher' was Nikki

Luxton of Sulivan Travel, who said she found the course this year "most enjoyable" and, even though she attended the course only last year, said, "I benefited from doing it again, and still learned a lot. Hopefully as a result of this year's course, we will have more accredited tour guides to help promote our tourism industry this summer.

The Control of the Co

Debbie Summers of Sulivan Travel gave some feedback from the Cruise ship industry regarding the importance of a tour guide. She said they

are, " "vital to ensuring a good experience for the visitor; the first and sometimes the only face of the Falklands; often the only provider of true

and accurate information. Debbie also highlighted the need

for a professional and knowledgeable approach from all tour guides and gave a few tips for a tour guide to be. well mannered, courteous, articulate, well-presented, not use bad language, preferably non-smoking when with the visitor and to avoid politics..." a useful reminder as. ".. you never know the background of your audience!

Historically, just one course per annum has been held, but following the level of interest shown this year Connie Stevens says it may be possible to hold a second course later in the season, if the demand is there

She urges anyone interested in the course, or wanting to attend a 'Refresher's' course to contact the office on 22215/27019, or email on tourism@horizon.co.fk. "If we know that the demand is there, we will do our best to arrange a second course. We need to hear from people first-hand if they are interested and what their availability is."

The course participants will have to wait just a little while to learn if they have been successful or not, with results of the assessments due out this weekend.

Mrs Stevens commented on the high level of input from everyone on the course: "Every single person worked extremely hard throughout the week and huge thanks go to them for their contribution and also for making the week so enjoyable.

She added, "The Falkland Islands Tourist Board would like to thank everyone involved with the organisation of the course for their input and professionalism and for making it an enjoyable and interesting experience - the speakers for giving up their time to pass on the broad spectrum of information; FITT for providing the coach each day. Phil-Middleton for the planning and dayto-day running of the course, the 'refreshers' for their contribution to the week and for participating generally. the invigilators and assessors, the Chamber of Commerce for looking after everyone so well and lastly, but by no means least, a big thank you to the course participants, for committing their time and brain power for the entire week.

'I'm sure most, if not all, went home on Friday and had a large and well-earned drink!"

with Pharmacist Martin Fisher Medicine and the effect on your driving

SOME medicines can affect your ability to drive.

You may not always know whether or not a medicine will affect your driving. The danger is that you may not notice a medicine has affected your ability to drive safely until you are in a driving situation where you need a fast, accurate response to avoid a crash.

When you start taking a new medicine, either prescribed by a doctor, or bought over the counter. check with pharmacy or your doctor that it is okay to drive while using the medicine.

Some medicines can make you;

drowsy or tired

dizzy, light headed or faint

unable to think clearly

have reduced co-ordination, including shaking and feeling unstable or shaky

edgy, angry or aggressive

sick, nauseous or otherwise nnwell

have blurred or double vision If you experience any of these effects or other effects that make it difficult to drive, speak with your doctor or pharmacy before driving

If you drive when affected by medicines you may cause an accident. You risk:

losing your licence

losing your insurance cover

prosecution

damaging property ...or worse, you could:-

injure or disable other people or yourself

kill someone

The effect of a medicine on your driving may be more if you:-

take two or more medicines that have similar effects on your driving

start a new medicine

take more than the prescribed or recommended dose of your medi-

drink alcohol at the same time

are tired

are older

Important

If your medicine affects your driving, stop driving. Do not stop taking your medicine and seek advice from your doctor or pharmacy.

Ask your pharmacist or doctor if the medicine you are taking, either on prescription or bought over the counter may affect your driv-

Read the labels and the leaflet of all medicines you take. Check with the pharmacy when your medicines has a warning that it causes or may cause drowsiness.

Some common conditions, and the medicine used for their treatment which may cause problems

driving are:

Hay fever and allergies - antihistamines (chlorphenamine, promethazine, newer antihistamines such as loratadine may cause drowsiness in some people)

Anxiety (diazepam)

Blood pressure tablets. Some can cause dizziness, particularly after the first dose.

Colds and Coughs (Actifed, Night Nurse)

Anti-depressants (amitriptyline, imipramine, paroxetine, fluoxetine)

Infections (some antibiotics such as ciprofloxacin)

Nausea (prochlorperazine)

Insomnia or sleeping problemsmost sleeping tablets (temazepam, nitrazepam, zopiclone) can leave people feeling tired the following

Travel sickness treatments should usually be taken some time before travel - take care on your journey to Mount Pleasant AirPain – Strong pain killers such as Syndol, dihydrodeine, codeine.

If you are taking recreational drugs this will not only affect your driving but is also illegal.

Even a small amount of alcohol, especially if taken with medicines, prescribed or bought over the counter can affect your driving skills - do not drive if you have been taking alcohol with your medi-

Take care and look after yourself. If your medicine does affect you, ask if there is an alternative. For example if you get hay fever there are anti-histamines that are less likely to make you drowsy.

Take a taxi or ask a friend to drive you if you are taking medicines that could affect your driving.

If you have missed a dose of your prescribed medicine, do not drive if your condition can make driving dangerous, eg if you have epilepsy or diabetes.

Manage your medical conditions by taking medicines correctly - if you have any problems talk to pharmacy or your doctor.

If the medicine is affecting you, do not drink alcohol. Talk to your pharmacist or doctor before mixing alcohol with your medicines.

Do not drive when you are tired, particularly on longer trips.

Do not use other people's medicines - they could have a different effect on you, possibly affecting your driving.

Remember, if you are worried about your medication then please call into the pharmacy or talk to

your doctor.

If your medication is causing side effects then in some cases these may pass after a few days, or your doctor may be able to recommend an alternative.

Liver and onions in a whole grain mustard sauce

Ingredients

l teaspoon oil I onion sliced finely

12 ozs lambs liver

3 tablespoons dry sherry I teaspoon cornflour

2 teaspoons whole grain mustard salt and black pepper to season Method

Toss the oil and onion together.

Heat a non stick frying pan and when hot add the onion mixture. Stir fry for five minutes until golden and softened.

Add the liver and cook for one minute, turn and cook for a further

minute Blend the sherry with the comflour. Add to the frying pan with the mustard and 7 fluid ounces of water.

Briskly bring to boil, stirring until the sauce has thickened slightly. Season to taste and serve immedi-

ately.
Serve with mashed potatoes and carrots.

Most offal needs the minimum of cooking; liver in particular tends to toughen if overcooked.

Wool report - week ending October 15 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices in New Zealand and Australia were generally "easier" for most micron categories relevant to the Falkland Islands last week.

The main exceptions were fleece wool lots around 22 micron, which gained a few pence per kilogram clean on the basis of strong bidding competition

As shown in the attached MPG. most micron categories lost approximately four pence per kilogram clean, however lots finer than 20 micron lost slightly more.

Currency issues continue to have a major bearing on the worlds wool markets.

As an example the strong Australian and New Zealand dollar values compared to the US\$, are negatively impacting on wool prices for their local farmers.

This contrasts to South Africa. where a weaker South African Rand (again relative to the US\$) has had a positive effect on wool prices for South African farmers.

*Exchange rates prevailing at time of publication used to convert wool prices into pence per ke clean basis (AUS \$2.48/£)

*Information derived from AWEX market report and Wool Record Weekly.

*Values based on average auction floor prices from Australian Eastern markets.

Antarctic Programmes Council meets in Punta

FOR the first time ever Punta Arenas hosted last weekend the annual meeting of the Council of Managers of National Antarctic Programmes Executive Committee which convened programme directors of the main members of the Antarctic Treaty

Global climate change, activities and programme instructions from the latest plenary Antarctic Treaty meeting in Hanover, sustainable tourism, conservation, scientific research programs plus logistics coordination for the coming 2007/2008 Polar Year were among the main issues addressed.

Karl Erb Director of Polar Programs from the US National Science

Foundation said that in a workshop scheduled next March in Texas we will be considering biological measures to improve Antarctic environmental management, which should be helpful for an effective sustainable tourism.

The US delegate also revealed that the Antarctic Treaty organization is working on guidelines for the main tourist activities in Antarctica.

Regarding Punta Arenas as a logistic hub for Antarctica, similar to the roles played by Christchurch in New Zealand and Hobart in Australia. Mr. Erb said that much depends on the city's initiative in developing, additional capacity in support of air and sea transport to the Antarctic continent.

Chile prepares for 2005 presidential election

FORMER Chilean Defence Minister Michelle Bachelet has the greatest chance of becoming the ruling coalition's candidate for the December 2005 presidential election, according to the latest opinion polls released in Santiago by Centro de Estudios de la Contemporánea CERC. Realidad

Ms Bachelet has growing support with 40%, followed by another former minister Soledad Alvear with a stagnant 21%; former president Eduardo Frei 9% and Interior minister Jose Miguel Inzulza 5%

As to the politicians with the most secure future, CERC's opinion poll indicated Santiago Mayor and leader of the opposition Joaquín Lavin with 58%, followed by Michelle Bachelet 48%, Soledad Alvear 38% and Sebastián Piñera

President Ricardo Lagos" personal approval stands at 56%, one point less than the 57% of last July.

Presidential aircraft catches fire

THE Argentine president's aircraft was forced to land fifteen minutes after take off on Tuesday when one of the two engines caught fire.

At around midday, President Kirchner, two cabinet ministers and staff left Buenos Aires metropolitan airport on board the Boeing 757/200 heading northeast for the province of Entre Rios to participate in the century celebration of a local town.

However when Tango 01 was climbing the left engine began to fail so pilots cut it off and headed for a nearby Air Force base where they landed safely fifteen minutes later.

"In such cases, the engine makes a big noise because it tries to turn off but it turns on again, and this continues to happen until it loses power," said the pilot. "This noise may sound like explosions

In order to guarantee the safety of the President, an exhaustive investigation has been ordered to look into the causes of the incident," said Presidential Chief-of-Staff José Pampuro in a written statement.

This is the first time Kirchner has suffered a scare on board the presidential plane since he took office in May last year. But the President has experienced two separate glitches on helicopters transporting him in the provinces of Jujuy and Mendoza in August last year and in

March this year respectively. Cabinet Chief Alberto Fernández said that Kirchner was "fine and calm" after the emergency landing.
"Thank goodness nothing happened," said Fernández. "It was just a scare."

Minister Anibal Interior Fernández and Planning and Investment Minister Julio De Vido were part of the delegation accompanying the President to the Entre Rios province town of Maria Grande. Kirchner was scheduled to attend a ceremony to mark the 100th anniversary of the foundation of the town, located some 370 kilometers north of Buenos Aires. He was to announce public works worth 29 million pesos for the area.

Losada, the air force spokesman, said that the president's aircrast undergoes rigorous maintenance and frequent inspection. The Tango 01 gets a full check every 15,000 hours of flying. "It had not reached 8,000 hours yet." said Losada.

One witness of the plane's takeoff at the metropolitan airport said that he saw the left turbine "spitting fire." Others said the plane produced at least 12 explosions while on the air. "At one point it looked as thought it would fall to the ground.

Michael and his Condor arrive home

FARMER and seafarer Michael Clarke and his crew have safely returned to the Falklands with his new boat Condor after sailing the Atlantic.

Condor arrived in Stanley harbour on Sunday evening to a large welcoming committee of family and friends, having travelled a distance of 8,237 nautical miles.

Including seven days of port calls, Michael clocked up a total of 49 days at sea as he delivered Condor, a replacement for the auxillary ketch Penelope, to her new home.

The epic journey started on September 4, when Condor left Heligoland in Germany with Michael at the helm accompanied by Peter Selicky and Burnd Buchner, who is now the owner of the Penelope.

Michael said that during the 42 days he spent at sea he experienced approximately 13 days of head winds adding that the weather overall was quite good and never, "... dangerously

The 16 metre long *Condor* is powered by a 220hp Rolls Royce engine which Michael explained is not specifically a marine engine but one from a truck. Progress was made at an average 196 nautical miles per day, burning 420 litres of fuel each day.

Stops were made at Guernsey. Tenerife, Cape Verde Islands, and Brazilian cities of Recife, Al Salvador. Rio de Janeiro and Rio Grande.

They arrived at Rio de Janiero



on September 9 where another Falklands farmer, Ron Dickson, joined the crew.

Ron, who gave up life on the ocean waves some 31 years earlier, replaced Burnd who left the ship at Rio to return to his work

Michael said he also gave Peter, who had only undertaken one short journey at sea before, the option to leave; however Peter opted to complete the voyage saying he had, Condor berthed in the Canache,

"...come this far and would carry on." Ron described Condor as the, smallest boat I have travelled any distance on.

He said the southwest Brazilian current combined with southwest winds resulted in a head wind which never produced storms but kept conditions choppy, adding the roughest time was the night before Condor's arrival in Stanley.

De-mining meeting

On October 26 and 27, the second meeting of the Joint Working Party (JWP) for carrying out a feasibility study on the clearance of land mines in the Falklands was held in London with the participation of diplomats and experts of the United Kingdom and the Argentine Repub-

A spokesperson for the Foreign and Commonwealth Office said. "The meeting took place in accordance with the understanding recorded in the Exchange of Notes of October 11, 2001, and is covered by the formula on sovereignty included in those notes.

According to a statement released after the meeting, the JWP considered the overall aims of the feasibility study, its technical and financial aspects, as well as management issues. "In this respect, it appointed new respective project man-

"Understandings" were reached on a number of measures of a practical nature.

Yesterday, His Excellency the Governor said he hoped to receive a report on the meeting in the coming week

The JWP will meet next during the second quarter of 2005, in Buenos

Falklands War: parliament looks toward 25th anniversary

THE Under-Secretary of State for Defence has been quizzed in Parliament about the British government's plans for 25th commemorating the Anniversary of the Falklands War.

Two Members of Parliament who have visited the Falklands in recent years, Lindsay Hoyle and Nigel Evans, were involved in the discussion with Ivor Caplin.

Mr Hoyle asked the defence man what steps his department is taking to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the war. Mr Caplin said "preliminary discussions" about commemorating the anniversary have taken place with the South Atlantic Medal Association (SAMA82). He commented, "When those ideas have been developed further

and agreed with the veterans I will make an appropriate announcement to the House.

Mr Hoyle then asked his colleague if he will ensure, "...there will be a tri-service approach to ensure that everyone will have the oppor-

tunity to go back to the Falklands?"
He added, "It will be the 25th anniversary of the conflict, so we must ensure that the families of those who died will be able to visit the Falklands. We must act sufficiently early because of the logistics of putting such a project together, and I look forward to my honourable friend taking those people out there."

Mr Caplin made no promises. He said, "I have written to the chairman of the South Atlantic Medal Association to ask about those issues. I hope that my honourable friend and the House are aware of the significant amount of work that the Ministry of Defence is undertaking on events in 2005.

We will stage commemorations for VE and VJ day, veterans' awareness week and a national day of celebration to commemorate the end of world war two on Sunday, July 10. Plans have recently been confirmed for the commemoration of the 200th anniversary of the battle of Trafalgar.

Mr Evans asked the defence under-secretary if "barmy political correctness" would be avoided.

He said, "...there might be a

temptation to play down the significance of the 25th anniversary to avoid stepping on the toes, or offending the sensitivities, of another country, but will the Minister assure me that that will not happen and that we will assist veterans who wish to visit the islands during the celebrations?

Mr Caplin responded, "I assure the House that the 25th anniversary will be taken seriously-the Government will certainly uphold that commitment, which was made to the veterans of the South Atlantic Medal Association."

Royal Marines' birthday

ROYAL MARINES living in the Falklands, both serving and retired, attended a dinner in Stanley last night to mark the Corps' 340th birthday. More than thirty Royal Marines

gathered in Malvina House Hotel for the celebration.

The centre piece of the evening was the Wilkinson Sword, gifted to the people of the Falkland Islands when the Marines were granted the Freedom of Stanley in 1976 and loaned back to the group by the museum for last night's party.

AT THE risk of sounding terribly depraved, I must confess to being fascinated by the recent sex abuse trials held on the tiny Pacific island of Pitcairn, home to descendants of the 18th-century mutineers from the British ship HMS Bounty.

In all, seven men of the island's population of just 47 faced more than 50 charges, some dating back 40 years.

Prosecutors, building their case on the testimony of eight women, painted a picture of a male-dominated society in which underage sex was

Initially, upon hearing of the scandal. I was sickened: my first instinct was that the perverts should be locked in dungeons and hung up by their

However, as the case built up, the story and my feelings towards it became much less clear cut.

Don't get me wrong. My reaction to those convicted for offences involving, in essence, babies (some as young as five) still centred around

However some of the cases involving older girls begged the question. how young is too young? Sixteen? Fourteen? Twelve

Some of the island's women came out in defence of the men, saying that while underage sex did happen, it was consensual and important to the island's survival. The overwhelming message coming from these islanders was, "...people in the outside world do not understand."

I was struck by this as it echoed sentiments expressed to me when I first arrived in the Falklands. At the time I was quite shocked at the proportion (but, I hasten to add, certainly not the majority) of young teenage girls who were "dating" - and I use that term loosely - men in their twenties or, in some cases, thirties,

These men didn't end up in court - at worst people would occasionally tut disapprovingly - and, seeing as these girls had obviously given their consent, nothing was done.

The issue seems to come down to what society deems as acceptable, something that doesn't necessarily reflect the law.

But is it ethically proper that, as long as underage sex is consensual and doesn't result in pregnancy, our society turns a blind eye?

Most of the Pacific island's cases have come to light as a result of retrospective soul searching by the women involved who have decided, years later, that what went on was inappropriate.

Could we too be at risk of Pitcairn-esque cases in the future?


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Public meeting news

Scheduled flights non-negotiable

COUNCILLORS have assured the public there will be no negotiations with Argentina concerning scheduled flights.

At Tuesday evening's meeting, one member of the public suggested that it would be a "big step forward" to come to an arrangement regarding scheduled flights, possibly along the lines of the "excellent 1999 agreement.

Councillor Norma Edwards said it would be a "big step back," adding if the Falklands were to say yes to Argentina on the subject they would, "...soon want something else.

Councillor Summers commented that any change would have to be made from a position of strength adding that if Argentina were given a scheduled flight they would. use it to undermine commercial flights."

The same member of the public said that people within the tourism sector were losing income because of the stance being taken; he added that he had the support of others who were not prepared to speak in public. Councillor Birmingham replied that there was, "...no pressure from anyone in tourism on councillors to introduce a flight."

Councillor Luxton said he would rather go back to, "...one boat a month than see a scheduled flight with Argentina."

A suggestion by the member of the public, who is involved in the cruise industry himself, that the British Government should pay compensation for lack of cruise ships was met with opposition from councillors and the meeting as

Councillor Summers used the Uturn of the Spanish Government to the staunch stance taken by Gibraltar as an example of standing

He said the British Government have been "strong and robust," on this subject and to give way would, "...open the way to being bullied in the future.

'Sensible and pragmatic' consultants

THE recent visit by consultants who conducted a Bio-security study is expected to cost the Falkland Islands Government approximately £5,000, councillors say.

The study is estimated to have cost a total of £15,000 of which the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) has offered to pay £10,000.

Responding to the question of whether the study was "necessary" Councillor Summers explained that the study was driven by the Senior Veterinary Officer to ensure that the disease-free status of the Falklands is protected. Mr Summers said to be able to demonstrate a disease-free status in animal health would be beneficial for the export of meat in the future.

Councillor Roger Edwards said he had met the two consultants at Fox Bay and considered them to be "sensible and pragmatic."

He added that there had recently been an embarrassing situation at Fox Bay when cargo from Chile had arrived with no paperwork available until the ship had arrived in Stanley, he also highlighted a recent incident when a baler had arrived in the Falklands with hay and seed still in it.

In response to a comment from the public that "it would seem somebody was not doing their job," Councillor Edwards said it was an area that had been overlooked for years and is now being addressed.

Building non-allocation is 'indefensible'

THE fact that the former Explosive Ordnance Disposal Unit building on Ross Road has been empty since April and has still not been allocated was described as "indefensible" by councillors.

The future of the building was to be decided by General Purposes Committee on Thursday and Councillor Summers said there was no reason why a firm decision could not be made then.

It was suggested that the time between decisions being made and both successful and unsuccessful tenders being informed was unacceptable.

Councillor Birmingham said that was a subject that councillors receive complaints on every month and in turn complain and it was hoped that the process would be speeded up.

Unsealed pavement is proving unpopular

THE large rocks on the edge of the road on Davis Street near Lookout Industrial Estate are there to stop drivers going on the smaller rocks said Councillor Cockwell in response to a comment on the "unsightly" boulders.

It was suggested that if the pavement had been put, "...where pave-ments belong," that is along the edge of the road, there would not have been a problem in the first place.

Councillor Edwards said he had enquired why the crushed rock was near the road and it had transpired that it was easier to complete the job that way than to change at that stage of the project.

One member of the public raised a laugh by pondering the outcome should two pushchairs meet from opposite directions on the newly

constructed pavement.

Soldier's nap leads to trouble | Photographer Strange's work on show

DON'T take a nap in your car if you've been drinking. That's the lesson a young soldier learned in court this week.

Corporal James Alexander, an information systems engineer from Mount Pleasant, pleaded guilty on Wednesday to being in charge of a vehicle parked in Waverley House carpark after drinking.

The court heard that Cpl Alexander was arrested by police after he was found lying in the driver's seat of his Mitsubishi hire vehicle late on October 12. The police were alerted to him after seeing lights flash on his vehicle.

When breathalysed at Stanley Police Station he provided a lower reading of 87 micrograms of alcoholper 100 millilitres of breath analysed. The legal limit is 35mg.

In court on Wednesday Cpl Alexander read a lengthy statement explaining his actions which led to the offence.

He said he had hired a vehicle from Mount pleasant to use for a tour of East Falkland. On the first evening of his holiday he visited the Globe Tavern and decided to leave his vehicle in the Waverley House carpark for the night.

Unsure of his bearings, he arranged to travel in a taxi to his room at Hillside Camp with a group of people. However as he fetched his overnight bag from his vehicle, the group left in the taxi.

He said he took the decision to "bed down" in his vehicle and, unable to lower the seats in the rear of the vehicle, he climbed into the

He locked the car, which activated the alarm, causing the lights on the vehicle to flash, as witnessed by the police. Cpl Alexander said he placed the car keys next to him on the passenger seat, lay back in his seat and tried to sleep, only to find a police officer knocking on his windows moments later.

Cpl Alexander said he had had no intention of driving, "...all I intended to do was sleep," however he accepted he had technically been in charge of the vehicle.

He said he wished to "apologise profusely" to the court and beg the court's forgiveness."

Cpl Alexander's commanding officer spoke on the defendant's behalf, giving a detailed account of his "exemplary" record.

Senior Magistrate, Mrs Clare Foulds, described the case as "difficult" and said she accepted Cpl Alexander had not intended to

However she said that being in charge of a vehicle was viewed as seriously as the act of driving, and a vehicle in the hands of someone affected by drink or drugs, "...becomes a lethal weapon.

She issued Cpl Alexander with the minimum driving disqualification, 12 months, and fined him

He will also pay £70 prosecution costs.

Also in court on Wednesday, Geoffrey Loftus pleaded guilty by post to a charge of speeding.

The Senior Magistrate said that, in view of Mr Loftus' two previous driving convictions, she wished to have him present in court to discuss the implications a possible driving ban might have on

The case was adjourned one week

Historical Governor's taxi lives again

A BUSY winter for Stanley Museum's staff is drawing to a close with several projects nearing completion.

Probably the most eye-catching of the projects has been the restoration of the Governor's Taxi, which was carried out by Bruce Miller and his team at Stanley Body Repairs.

The 1972 Austin FX4 made its debut last Thursday, when it transported His Excellency the Governor and his bride. Caroline, to and from Christ Church Cathedral

The London cab, which served Governors and carried many visiting dignitaries over two decades, was retired from Government House in

the early 1990s.

Time took its toll on the vehicle while it was in storage and it was in very poor condition when the Museum and National Trust decided to begin restoration last year. The Governor, Mr Howard Pearce, gave permission for the Austin to be used by the Trust and even provided the Crown transfers to complete the look.

look.
"We were delighted when the Governor indicated that he would like to use the car for his wedding." says Museum Manager Leona Roberts. "It was the best possible first outing and quite an honour... Still, a special occasion demands a special vehicle!

"Bruce has done a great job of the restoration and the taxi looks

better than ever."

Special dispensation for a unique number plate was given by the Su-



perintendent of the Royal Falkland Islands Police and is the finishing touch - "FIMNT" - for Falkland Islands Museum and National Trust.

The Austin will be used this year as a shuttle to the Museum and Cartmell Cottage and initially will be operated by Museum staff, although the Trust is interested in hearing from anyone who might like to help out with driving this special vehicle during the summer.

Inaugural agriculture meeting

THE need to monitor the Department of Agriculture's (DoA)ten year business plan on an annual basis was established at the first meeting of the reconstituted Agriculture Advisory Committee on Tuesday.

The purpose of the plan is to show the rural sector where the DoA would like to see the agricultural sector in ten years' time and to give DoA staff a clear focus and direction for the department with clear set long term targets and short to medium term operating policies. For councillors and the government the plan describes the benefit to the Islands' economy from its investment in agriculture.

Although the plan is designed to show results at the end of a ten year period Councillor Mike Summers said the results need to be collated on an annual basis so that it can be assured projects are moving at the right speed and in the right direction.

Senior Agriculture Advisor Neil Judd explained that the change in fibre diameter of wool would be marginal until 2009. He said the project will really get under way with the implantation of 500 embryos from the best animals in the Islands; with the process being repeated on a larger scale in 2007, things should really "start to move" when the progeny of the 2005 implants get to work on the ground.

Also considered by the meeting was a Livestock Improvement Programme paper which suggests that the future of sheep production in the Islands does not rest with any individual breed of sheep but with a "type" of animal able to flourish and meet market opportunities

Board member Jimmy Forster expressed concern at the piles of calcified seaweed and rock phosphate unused and in cases unusable on some farms. It was suggested that farmers were loath to spread the calcified scaweed as the benefits were not as great as the cost of spreading. Director of Minerals and Agriculture Phyl Rendell referred to the issue as "inherited baggage" adding, "we need to see it through to the end." It was decided the issue be taken to the farming community via the Rural Business Association (RBA) for a possible solution to the issue.

There was discussion on the future of the beef industry with Mr Forster saying there is lack of interest, it is, "...losing momentum and barely satisfying the local market." He pointed out that three to four years ago farmers were still breeding sheep solely for wool and that cattle breeders needed similar help or guidance. Councillor Mike Summers said the DoA should consult with FIMCo and cattle breeders to see what can be put together.

A review of Veterinary Services is to go to the November Executive Council meeting; this will include an out of hours charge which, it is hoped, will stop abuse of the service. The recommended charge is £15 for weekends, and after 5pm and before 8am on weekedays.

Mr Justin Knight asked what is happening with the fencing scheme which was initially to run from 1998 to 2002 and which is behind schedule with the last consignment of fencing not having turned up, and whether checks were to take place or would it be allowed to run its course.

Neil Judd said the whole programme is to be "critically reviewed." In the mean time DoA staff members Doug Martin, Andrew Pollard and Damien O'Sullivan will check the situation whenever they were in camp. With regard to materials not erected if somebody else needs them they should be reallocated.

Results of the review and proposals will be discussed at the next meeting

Quality Falklands Wool (QFW) inspections are to take place at all sheds every year and are being inspected now by DoA staff

Mr Judd said he welcomes people who are genuinely interested to join the wool programme group. He assured that the scheme is still running but it is, "...time to pull it to pieces and put it together again."

Pensions: legal understanding sought

THE Falkland Islands Pensions Board has sought to clarify a point queried by a reader of Penguin News.

In a letter to the editor last week, Mr Mike Harris queried the circumstances in which, "When someone retires they are required by law to use no less than 75% of their pension to purchase an annuity

Alison Inglis of the Falkland Is-Pension Board clarified,"...in the UK contributions by a scheme member to a personal pension or occupational pension scheme are tax deductible on the scheme member only if the pension scheme is approved by the Inland Revenue (as most UK pension schemes are).

"If a UK pension scheme has Inland Revenue approval, then the scheme member is required to use at least 75% of his pension fund to purchase an annuity, ie. a pension or income for life. Up to 25% of the pension fund can be taken as a taxfree lump sum. The annuity forms part of the pensioner's taxable income.

In the Falkland Islands contributions by a scheme member to a personal pension or occupational pension scheme (wherever that pension scheme is based) are tax deductible only if the pension scheme is approved by the Commissioner of Taxation under the provisions of the Taxes Ordinance.

Ms Inglis sais, "A personal pension scheme will be approved by the Commissioner of Taxation only where (a) it does not allow contributions to be paid into the scheme by anyone other than the member and his employer, and (b) the aggregate of contributions made by a member and his employer in any one year does not exceed the lesser of £10,000 or 20% of the employee's taxable earnings."

According to the Pensions Board, an occupational pension scheme will be approved by the Commissioner of Taxation only where:

(a) it is established for the sole

purpose of providing 'relevant ben-efits' (principally pensions and lump sums on death or retirement) in respect of service as an employee:

(b) every employee who is entitled to be a member of the scheme is given a written statement of all essential features of the scheme:

(c) the scheme has an administrator resident in the Falkland Islands: (d) the employer is a contribu-

(e) the scheme is established in connection with a trade or undertaking carried on in the Falkland Islands: and

(f) any lump sum payable on death whether before or after retirement does not exceed the greater of £100,000 or 4 times the member's annual salary.

Ms Inglis said, "The rules of the Falkland Islands Pensions Scheme require a member to use at least 75% of his pension fund to purchase an annuity, but this is not a requirement for approval of a pension scheme by the Commissioner of Taxation.

"However, it should be noted that where an occupational pension scheme has been approved by the Commissioner of Taxation, any amount exceeding 25% of the value of the pension fund which is taken by the retiring member in cash will be taxed as income unless it relates to employment outwith the Falkland Islands.

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Your questions answered

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O IT IS now the time to clarify the laws on child employment, if there are any?

At what age can a child legally work and for how many hours? Are there different allowances for different ages, if so what are these?

A Our thanks to Crown Counsel Ros Cheek for providing the following response.

There is existing law relating to the employment of children which is set out in the Employment of Children Ordinance 1966. That law states that no child may be employed until the child has attained the age of two years below that which is for the time being the upper limit of the compulsory school age by virtue of the Education Ordinance. Essentially this means that a child may not be employed at all until the child is in his or her last two years' of compulsory schooling.

The Ordinance does not restrict employment of a child who is no longer of compulsory school age (although there is restriction elsewhere in the law concerning the employment of young persons, ie persons under 18, in certain industrial undertakings, eg employment in quarries, manufacturing, construction and dock work).

The Ordinance also limits the circumstances in which a child, who has reached the relevant age, may be employed. Therefore a child may not be employed:-

(a) before the close of school hours on any day on which the child is required to attend school;

(b) before seven o'clock in the morning or after seven o'clock on the evening on any day; or

(c) for more than two hours on any day on which the child is required to attend school, or

(d) for more than two hours on any Sunday; or

(e) to lift, carry or move anything so heavy as to be likely to cause the child injury.

It should be noted that "employment" does not mean work experience arranged by the Education Department, nor is it generally considered to include casual babysitting for friends or family.

There are proposals under consideration for the law to be improved, by extending the range (but not the total) of hours between which a child of the relevant age may be employed on a Saturday or school holiday, and limiting the hours during which a child may be employed on any day which falls before a school day.

Q WHY do some farms deem it necessary to shear 'in lamb' ewes?

A Senior Agricultural Advisor, Mr. Neil Judd, kindly provided the following response.

The shearing of "in-lamb" ewes is a management decision that is not taken lightly. Weather conditions need to be managed and animal welfare issues considered.

Principally there are three key reasons for the practice (which by the way, is not an uncommon one in many sheep producing countries):

1. Wool quality is significantly improved as a result of shearing at a time that localises the staples 'position of break"

Pre-lamb shearing in spring. means that the wool's weakest point is restricted towards the tip of the staple rather than it occurring towards the middle of the staple. Tender wool with "mid staple breaks" could be discounted by as much as 10%.

2. Lamb survival. It is expected that pre-lamb shorn ewes will seek shelter more actively during adverse weather and in doing so, lead their lambs to shelter as well.

Rather than as with full-wool ewes which are more comfortable during adverse weather and hence NOT seeking shelter to the detriment of their lambs.

3. Full-wool ewes possibly suffer higher losses at lambing (more become "caste") due to the weight and bulk of their wool as compared to pre-lamb shorn ewes.

O What is the future for the cattle yards at Saladero?

What is the future of the link fence for reindeer constructed at Saladero now the herd has been resited?

A Director of Agriculture, Mrs Phyll Rendell said, "The cattle yards at Brenton Loch are a Falkland Islands Development Corporation asset and will be utilised by Falklands Landholdings for cattle

"The fencing constructed around a paddock to retain reindeer will be used as a quarantine station for animals as and when needed and also as a high security ram pad-

Plant operation: let the industry look after its own

I WRITE with regard to the Construction Industry Training Board cards for operating plant.

First of all we need to define plant. Generally speaking, this form of equipment does not require a special licence to operate, given that the plant is on a building or construction site.

To move plant from one area to another, either requires a full HGV or a low loader trailer in respect of tracked plant.

Now we will look at the historical agenda that brought us to this point in time. In the mid 1990s FIG insurers required that all FIG employees take a health and safety course and also prove to the trainers that they were able to operate the plant to their satisfaction. This did not require a special licence. To move items of plant (wheeled type), all that is required by law is a driving licence that covers the type of vehicle that is being moved (ie HGV 1 covers all that is on the Islands).

So we come to the situation that we are now in - plant permits. This is a load of waffle. Do we have a police force that wants to regulate everything? That really is not their

In the private sector it is up to the owner of the plant as to who operates their equipment and where. If this plant has to move over the public roads and has wheels then the person driving has the relevant category for that piece of plant to be able legally to drive

So what I am implying is that the RFIP is not the organisation to regulate this system; let them look after licensing of motor vehicles and let the construction and building sector, both public and private, look after their own - after all they do not let cowboys operate very expensive machinery.

Argentine war film due out April 2

A NEW Argentine film about the Falklands War, due to open officially on April 2 next year, has already begun to pick up industry prizes.

Entitled Iluminados por el Fuego (Illuminated by fire), the movie is described by Argentine newspaper Clarin as the first film to show the tragedy of the 1982 war. It has already picked up five film industry awards.

Clarin reports that Foreign

Minister Rafael Bielsa was in tears watching it - particularly when it shows Argentine soldiers being mistreated by some of their own officers. President Kirchner apparently saw the film while on his way to New York on September 8

The final scenes were filmed in the Falklands with a veteran returning to the Islands, but much of the rest was filmed in the province of San Luis.

New upgraded drivers licence available

THE Royal Falkland Islands Police are offering new upgraded drivers licences

From November 1 all drivers licences will be printed on security watermarked paper to prevent copying.

A police spokesperson said, "If the applicant would like a photograph on the licence they should either send a digital one by e mail;

this can be put directly on to the licence or bring in a passport size one to the station and this could be scanned on.'

All drivers licences issued to date will remain in force, but anyone wishing to upgrade and have theirs printed on watermarked paper can do so; a fee of £5.00 will be charged for a duplicate licence.

Canon Palmer becomes a doctor

A FORMER cannon of Christ Church Cathedral has qualified for his PhD

Canon Dr Stephen Palmer has expressed his "deep gratitude" to the many people who helped and supported him during the six years he worked on his PhD thesis.

Seafarers enjoy a warm welcome

THE Lighthouse Seamen's Centre is famous for its mouthwatering. calorie-laden confections which tempt even the most determined dieter.

The food is the highlight of most people's visit to the Seamen's Centre known locally as 'the mission' but what of the hardwork that goes on behind the scenes?

The centre was established in a Portacabin in 1995; this humble building was later converted into an accommodation unit when the mission was rehoused in its present purpose-built building six years ago.

Ken and Mim Newton have run the establishment for the last four years with help from a host of volunteers.

They work full time with son Matthew also on the pay roll for a couple of hours each morning to assist with maintenance and computers. Tanya, who recently arrived from Russia, works hard at the kitchen sink, and uses her new job to help master the English language.

The Mission's opening hours are Wednesday to Saturday 10am to 5pm and Sunday 12 to 5pm. The centre stays open until 9pm when there are ships in. Next month a Chilean couple, Patricio and Carmen, will be working full time at the mission and Mim said once she has them "trained up" opening hours may be extended.

The workings of the kitchen are a vital part of the fund-raising needed to keep the mission up and running and providing its service to seafarers.

The centre relies heavily on charitable donations to keep it operational and is particularly grateful for the support offered by Southwest Atlantic Mid Winter Swim (SWAMS) and donations made on a monthly basis by Seafish Falklands and FIBOW, (a Seafish/Spanish joint venture company). Fortuna fishing company and Cable and Wireless also make annual donations. The Stanley based Charity Shop offers both financial support and clothing for sailors. Mim



says customers are always "very generous" and tend to pop their loose change in a donations 'tank' on the counter.

The mission plays a vital role in assisting seamen in difficulty. In the event of a disaster at sea the emergency services immediately contact the mission staff, who are essentially on call 24 hours a day. They prepare food, clothes and look after the general welfare of the seamen which includes the provision of phone cards so families can be "contacted and reassured".

When one fishing boat sank, the British Forces assisted and kitted out 50 sailors, right down to spare socks and razor blades.

Ken and Mim, along with their helpers, more recently put together 50 kits to be stored at South Georgia; Mim commented that, "....the washing and ironing seemed never ending"

The Mission also has several large 'bins' that hold clothing and footwear and these are popular with many of the less well paid fishermen who take back clothing for members of their family; Mim said children and baby items are particularly popular.

The crews from some ships have quirky habits and two Consolidated Fisheries Ltd (CFL) ships, the Valiant and the Gambler are known as the 'ice-cream ships - the crew of one has been known to consume 14 litres of ice cream in one evening.

On the day I visited the mission, I mucked in to help. With lunch time fast approaching Tanya had to go and collect her children and I took over at the sink and helping in any other way I could.

The special on offer was 'fish pie a la Mim' who had improvised and changed the customary mashed potato topping to one of sliced layers of new potatoes with a crunchy cheese finish. I hoped that it didn't prove too popular as, having enjoyed the smell of it cooking for the best part of the morning, I fancied I could see my name on one portion.

About 22 customers arrived over the next hour, many of whom Mim spots at the entrance and has their chips in the fryer and their favourite burger in the pan before they get to the counter to place their order.

Ken takes the orders and scribbles illegible hieroglyphic-like characters on pieces of paper which obviously mean something to Mim as everyone was happy with their meal. I note that all customers order small or medium portions and having seen the size of a medium helping of fish pie I know it would take a brave soul to attempt a large one.

The kitchen is run with military precision - Mim is Captain in the kitchen and everything is shipshape and orderly.

Being a Friday, it was not considered a particularly busy day the weekends are hectic and up to 60 meals have been served in one day with many customers opting to dine off their laps in the reading area rather than miss out on the dish of the day.

With the rush over I sample the fish pie - it is delicious. My next task is to ice cakes ready for the weekend; 15 different types of cakes and biscuits are baked every week. Mim said she and Ken also undertake birthday parties and entertain the children with their puppet show, providing of course that it doesn't get in the way of their regular operations. The Mission is always open to seamen regardless of what other functions are taking place on the premises.

The trustees of the Seamen's Centre are Keith Biles, Reverend Paul Sweeting who is Chairman, Monsignor Michael McPartland and Jackie Earnshaw who helps out on a regular basis in the kitchen.


The Cadets' next general fund raising event will be a Battle Day Dinner and Dance on December 7

"We will also be auctioning four fantastic items on the night. More details next month."





Recipes for the Falklands

Main course: easy peasy Paella

Ingredients:

1/2 cup dry white wine I tsp saffron Olive oil

1/2 cup chopped onion

I cup long grain rice 1 red pepper

1 orange pepper

3 cups chicken stock

6 oz breast of chicken, skinless

1/2 lb prawns

1 lb mussels

1/2 cup artichoke hearts

I cup frozen peas

1/2 cup chopped tomatoes

Pre-cooking:

Preheat oven to 350F.

Let peas defrost.

Chop the onion, tomato and peppers.

Peel the prawns.

Cut the chicken in small cubes. Scrub and debeard the mussels, discarding any that are open (dead).

Method

Put a generous splash of olive oil in a frying pan. Preheat the pan for one minute at med-high heat

Sauté the onion 2-3 mins until soft and brown

Add the rice, sauté until golden stirring so it won't burn

Add the wine and saffron and stir until all the wine is absorbed

Stir in the peppers

Add 2 cups of chicken stock, 1/4 cup at a time stirring until the rice absorbs the stock (this is going to take a while)

Add the last cup of chicken stock

Add the cubed chicken

Add the prawns and mussels, tucking them in the rice

Bake in the oven for 8-10 minutes until mussels open

Add the peas, tomato and artichoke hearts and bake for 2 more

Saffron is quite hard to find and expensive, but is worth getting as it gives the rice a yellow coloring and adds the essence of the paella flavor.

Sometimes you can find rice with the saffron already in it, which is much cheaper than buying the saffron by itself.

To peal prawns easily:

Hold so that you can grab it from the back and peel off the legs of the prawns.

Peel off a piece of the shell around the head area.

Hold on to the head area of the shrimp and pull the tail, when done correctly the whole shell will come

Dessert: peanut butter brittle

Ingredients

2 cups sugar '4 cup water 11/2 cups light syrup 2 cups salted peanuts 2 to 21/2 cups peanut butter ½ tsp. vanilla 11/2 tsp. baking soda

Method:

Combine sugar and water in heavy saucepan

Bring mixture to full rolling boil over high heat, stirring constantly.

Stir in syrup.

Cook to hard crack stage, 300

Meanwhile, mix peanuts, peanut butter and vanilla.

Remove syrup from heat; at once add peanut butter mixture and baking soda; stir.

Working quickly, pour onto buttered cookie sheet; spread with fork.

Cool; break into pieces.

iii.brew kit or a couple of oxos iv. sharp blade or saw

v. a copy of ground to air signals (future tips)

vi. packet of nuts and raisins vii. mini maglite

viii. firelighter

ix. safety pins x. Band Aids

xi. wire wool and a flint/steel (bush firelighter)

xii. candle

xiii. tin opener (military style)

polish the lid and you have a signalling device or a mirror and the base is a good mess tin.

The list is endless and you will soon be collecting items that

attract you.

A ideal emergency ration pack is a tin of sardines in oil: either drink the oil as a source of protein or puncture a small hole in the lid and put in a piece of cloth and hey presto you have a night light.

Massage techniques and the importance of touch

HEAR the word massage and what do you think of?

Chances are it conjures up a picture of a dimly lit room, red walls, mirrors on the ceiling and a scantily clad female, half heartedly rolling the florid oily flesh of a groaning, overweight middle- aged man.

Or could it be a vision of a burly hirsute Mediterranean male coming at you through the steam with just a towel between you and he.

Now think, quiet, warm, safe and fragrant surroundings and your body enjoying the benefit of gentle soothing, sweeping strokes, easing away tension and aches.

Massage is a universal instinct and from the day our ancestors dropped from the trees, humans have known that it helps to rub a sore limb or hold an injured area to ease the pain. Touch also helps convey a feeling of trust and sense of caring.

It is thought the word massage is derived from the Portuguese 'amasser' to knead, or possibly the Arabic 'massa' to touch and it can be safely claimed that massage is one of the oldest therapy known to man.

The earliest writings about it and its benefit to man comes from China and dates back to around 3,000BC, but it is also well documented in Roman, Greek, Indian and Persian literature.

It was relatively late coming to the West and the first written record of massage was in the mid 1500's. The author was widely ridiculed at the time and it wasn't until 1780 when Clement Tissot wrote a more convincing explanation of it, also covering occupational therapy, which then moved it into the realms of respectability.

The massage technique comes in a wide variety of forms and deliveries. You can be acupressured, pressure pointed, elbowed, manipulated, stood upon, have your Charkas balanced, Shatzuied within an inch of your life and there would still be plenty of other methods including reflexology to try. Each one is of equal benefit and a matter of personal choice.

Most, not all, borrow in some small way from a method known as Swedish Massage which began life as 'The Swedish Movement Cure' and it was in fact invented by the Dutch doctor Henrik Ling in the late 1800's. He separated the active and assisted exercise from the massage, resulting in the different professions of Physical Therapy and Massage Therapy. He also simplified the massage movements into five basic strokes; efflourage, petrissage, friction, tapotement and vibration.

He described The Swedish Massage technique as, 'the systematic manipulation of soft tissues for the purpose of normalising them primarily through the use of hands, forearms, elbows or feet.

Massage's main use is to relax

the body and mind and it is not necessarily any more beneficial if there is pain involved. Gentle massage without any form of painful delivery is far more beneficial to the recipient as they are inclined to be more relaxed.

Various schools of thought and those in the medical profession believe that many of modern health problems that we suffer can be directly linked back to high stress levels over a period of time.

It is well documented that if someone is subjected to stress, input from the five senses travels through the nervous system and triggers the hypothalamus in the brain to send out signals. These signals reach the pituitary gland which is the master gland of the endocrine system. A hormonal response sent from the pituitary gland triggers the adrenal glands to release adrenaline into the blood stream to prepare the body for 'fight or flight.

The normal functioning of the body is disrupted as a body in a state of stress needs to conserve its energy to propel muscles. The adrenaline coursing through the bloodstream causes blood pressure to rise and muscles to tense. Breathing becomes shallow and rapid, desire and hunger are suppressed and digestion stops. The brain becomes hyper alert.

As a temporary expedient, the stress response is vital, but if the situation is prolonged with no release of tension, the results can be less than favourable. As well as increasing the heart rate and the blood pressure, the body diverts vital resources from the immune system and cholesterol levels rise. Common problems of prolonged stress include fatigue, headache, heartburn, indigestion, hair loss, insomnia and depression.

Other more serious conditions and diseases associated with prolonged stress are acidosis, backache, Irritable Bowel Syndrome, Crohn's disease, diverticulosis and possible heart attack.

With this in mind it shows that living in a state of heightened anxiety is not to be recommended and if we were fortunate enough to be an executive for a large company we may have to be sent off to a health farm to learn techniques for dealing with this, but for most of us we have to learn other methods of relaxation to help reduce the stress in our lives, one of which is massage.

A caring touch stimulates the brain to produce endorphins, the body's natural mood elevators, and pain suppressors, but massage is far more than just a treatment that makes us feel good; studies have shown that massage enhances our immune function and lowers levels of stress hormones.

Massage calms and slows the heartbeat, lowers the blood pressure and brings a sense of balance and equilibrium to the body not to mention a reduced feeling of stress and anxiety.

When muscles are over worked waste products such as lactic acid can accumulate causing soreness, stiffness and possibly muscle spasm. Massage improves the circulation, increases the blood flow bringing fresh oxygen to body tissues which in turn can assist the elimination of waste products and speed healing after injury.

It would be prudent to mention that there are certain medical conditions including women in early pregnancy where massage would not be recommended. A chat with your doctor would clarify if you were indeed at risk and would be wise before undertaking any massage therapy.

The massage of babies has become more popular in the west with a proliferation of baby massage groups springing up in the UK. In Eastern countries it has been the norm in extended families for generations and as most parents know the rhythmic stroking and rocking will generally settle the most fretful of babies and children. Skin to skin contact between mother/father and baby is highly recommended in helping establish a strong bond from an early age and gentle touching of premature babies is encouraged in hospitals even when they cannot be held.

Massage and touch are inextricably linked, one usually leads to the other. It is well documented that humans and other mammals need touch, not only to survive but also to thrive.

It is also important to recognise that there are children and indeed some adults who abhor the thought of being touched and actively avoid personal contact with other humans where possible. These are generally extreme cases.

Possibly our first introduction to massage is the wonderfully relaxing scalp massage at the hairdressers and all some will ever experience through their lives, despite there being a whole world of different types and forms of massage and manipulation for the tak-

Possibly the best example of touching and wanting to be touched comes when we are in love. Ah, those heady days of madness when all you want to do is look in each other's eyes and hold hands for hours on end. Those wonderful times of exploring each other's sensitive spots that thrill and delight; if only we could sustain the madness at such a level, but like all good things they slowly wane over time and we settle into our hum drum lives of domesticity and all that touching gets forgotten between the sink and the bedroom.

Consider the people you know in your life who never get touched from one week to the next. Sure they may get a perfunctionary kiss on the cheek at Christmas or birthdays but generally are never hugged or touched in any meaningful way. This deprivation of human contact is not only suffered by the elderly, it is increasingly being experienced by the younger single people who are not in relationships and no longer getting married with quite the regularity they used to.

Often people enter into a casual encounter just so they may experience the basic need for another human to touch them even if only for a few hours, such is the desire for contact. As time goes by most people if not touched regularly learn to live without it. They will say it doesn't matter, but a very important element is missing from their

Unfortunately being married does not exclude people from the lack of touch. Situations such as illness, temporary separation or breakdown in the relationship that see two people together but not.

The basic goal of massage therapy is to help the body heal itself and to increase health and general well being. Touch is the core ingredient of massage and also combines science and art. Practitioners learn specific techniques for massage and use their sense of touch to determine the right amount of pressure to apply to each person and locate areas of tension and other soft tissue problems.

Touch also conveys a sense of caring which is an important component in the healing relationship, but you don't have to be a trained professional to deliver the gift of touch to someone who would benefit from it. Surprise an aunt this weekend with a foot massage or a ruffle of her blue rinsed hair - show her you care.

If you want to experience the sensation of touch on yourself I suggest you select a quiet warm room, put on your favourite piece of music, take off your top and stretch out your left arm, palm down. Starting with the back of your fingers run your right hand as lightly as you can from the fingertips to your shoulder. This touch should be as light as you possibly can to feel the sensation.

Do this very slowly three times, then turn your left arm over and repeat it three more times starting at your fingertips and move to your arm pit, noting the extra sensitivity at your inside elbow joint. Now change arms.

You will notice that the skin of our arms has taken on quite a different sensation, possibly one you have never felt before and will last for some considerable time. Keep the touch light at all times.

But don't stop at your arms, experiment with your chest, back, neck, face, head, feet, hands in fact anywhere on your body. Even better, get your partner or a friend to do it for you. Find out what feels good and get those endorphins re-leased into the blood stream for the feel good' effect.

Wool report - week ending October 23 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices in Australia were generally "steady" for most micron categories relevant to the Falkland Islands last week.

As shown in the attached "micron price guide", prices fluctuated by a penny or two "here and there" for some micron categories, but this was attributed to specific buying needs to satisfy particular orders, rather than any underlying wool demand issues.

The strength of the Australian and New Zealand currency relative to the US \$ continues to impact on the worlds wool markets.

The Australian dollar, as an example recorded solid rises to reach over 73.5 US cents/ AUS \$.

It is interesting to note that analysts reported strength in the markets for well prepared stylish wool that had very sound staple strength. Falkland Island wool from wethers and young dry ewes falls into this category.

It is hoped that such market discrimination, based on quality, continues, and even more importantly, flows through to demand (and of course, price) for Falkland Islands wool in the coming months. Note



Ready to take off, but not cleared

Aerolineas del Sur, the creation of the Spanish tourism group Marsans that successfully overhauled Aerolineas Argentinas launched this week an aggressive marketing cam-paign in Chile hoping to speed the authorisation to operate domestic flights in the turf of all powerful Lan Chile.

The full page adverts in Santiago's main newspapers presents Marsans as a worldwide tourism organization which employs 21,000 people and advances some of the air fares for the planned routes, which are pending the final approval from the Chilean Aviation authorities.

According to the adverts Aerolineas del Sur Santiago-Punta Arenas-Santiago air fare will cost 95,000 Chilean pesos (it does not include the boarding tax of 9,342 Chilean pesos), but is 19% cheaper than Lan Chile' lowest fare, 111,900 Chilean

Similarly with other destinations such as Iquique, Antofagasta and Puerto Montt which are also 19% cheaper and have no restrictions such as a week's anticipated reservation for Lan's lowest fare.

The tentative date for take off is November 30, but Marsans announced that in November 5 travellers will be able to check the company's portal and tourism agents will be entitled to make reservations.

Uruguyan flock forecast to rebound

Uruguayan lamb production and wool clip is forecasted to rebound in 2005 after having reached its lowest in 2004 according to forecasts from the country's Ministry of Agricul-ture, Livestock and Fisheries and the Uruguayan Wool Secretariat.

Since the eighties when Uruguay had a flock of 25 million sheep the number has been consistently dropping with the 2003 census showing 9,798,000 and the 2004, still unreleased, estimated in just above nine million.

However improved wool and lamb prices together with credits to increase the number of ewes should help revert the tendency next year when an additional 300.000 lambs and 3,5 million kilos of wool are expected. According to Minister Martin Aguirrezabala credits have been extended to at least 400 farmers with the intent of retaining 300,000 ewes for 2005.

In the eighties just before the decline of the wool industry Uruguayan pastures were dedicated 57% to cattle and 43% to sheep. Currently the ratio is 77 and 23%.

Sheep in Uruguay have always bred in the poorer soils of the country but lately as lamb production has become more attractive the tendency has been to move the flock to better pastures with forestry (mainly eucalyptus) moving into the cheaper

Low levels of red tide reported

THE third monitoring cruise undertaken this season in Magallanes Region jointly by Chilean Fisheries and Health officials indicated a descent in the level of the toxic red tide in almost the whole of the coastline.

In Puerto Eden toxin levels are below the 80 micrograms per 100 grams of seafood, (maximum level for human consumption), which is lower than in other seasons. Further south in Puerto Williams no measurable levels were detected but in coastline areas close to Punta Arenas levels ranged between 39 and 66

micrograms.

However to the north of the Ultima Esperanza province levels ranged between 89 and 175 micrograms. Punta Arenas sanitary authorities reiterated the warning that when purchasing sea food, consumers must demand the official "toxicological" test which certifies it's apt for consumption. Similarly whoever has access to sea food without the certificate can request the toxicological test in the Health Serv-



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School kids conquer Usborne





Fixed penalties could end court ordeal for minor traffic offenders

DRIVERS who commit minor road traffic offences may no longer be required to face a traumatic visit to court.

Provision for a Fixed Penalty System for minor road traffic offences is to be made in the upcoming Road Traffic Bill.

Attending his first meeting of the Police Committee on Tuesday. Justice of the Peace Andy Brownlee made the suggestion that such a system could be implemented.

Mr Brownlee said it was a more efficient way of dealing with minor offences adding that it is a, .nice-in between stage to have before going to court."

The Attorney General, Mr David Lang, said he agreed with the proposal and that provision would be made in the Road Traffic Bill.

He said, as the law stands at the moment, anyone who is charged with a criminal offence. "must be taken to court," because the Constitution states anyone charged "must be afforded a trial."

He said the provision would re-

quire a change in the Constitution so that anyone charged, "shall have the right to a trial.

Chief Police Officer, Superintendent Dave Morris, said he was, "happy to implement," the sys-

Councillor Stephen Luxton explained the fixed penalty system will allow minor traffic offences to be dealt with outside of court but will still give the offender the right to appeal in court if they wish to challenge the penalty.

He added that other minor offences such as littering could possibly be included. The dropping of glass bottles outside public houses and litter on Arch and Victory Greens were cited as examples.

On Wednesday Superintendent Morris said he could not yet give precise examples of exactly what offences would be covered by the change in law, as this is to be finalised in conjunction with the Attorney General.

The MPs will depart the Falklands on Thursday, November 25.

I'M SURE that many think my job is a bit of a cushy number, what with swanning off to Sea Lion Island on helicopter day trips (see page 4) and other little perks I have enjoyed over the past year or so. It is all in the line of duty and I hope that readers enjoy the resulting articles.

The Sea Lion Island excursion was particularly enjoyable however the inevitable question that sprang to mind was, why isn't the Government's Air Service (FIGAS) providing the service instead of (no offence to them, of course) British International Helicopters - and in the process keeping a rather substantial piece of tourism-generated revenue within the Islands? FIGAS seems to have missed a great opportunity

I spoke to the Chief Executive, also one of the daytrippers to Sea Lion Island, asking why FIGAS aren't undertaking the tours, and saying that this appears to be a huge amount of money for a subsidised department to be

turning down

Mr Simpkins said it is basically a problem of logistics and resources. He said FIG would love to operate a chartered flight tourist service and the income would be most welcome. But The busiest time for FIGAS is during the tourist season. He said, "The promoters of the Sea Lion Island excursion must have certainty. FIGAS could only provide that at the expense of its normal service which would impact on other tourists who have booked FIGAS flights and domestic customers." He added that there have been complaints from residents in the past when they have been unable to get a flight because seats have been allocated to tourists

Now, I wouldn't dare comment on the logistics involved in getting 16 tourists in and out of Sea Lion Island in a day - possibly some are insurmountable. However the dates of these tours are arranged up to two years in advance - surely that is sufficient warning for everyone to work around? Other tour operators would be well aware of the days a reduced service would apply - as would resident customers - and I'm sure they would be happy to

work around FIGAS's commitments.

There seems to be a lack in commercial motivation within the government. It's highly unlikely that a few complaints from the locals about not getting a flight would stand in the way of a decision if there was more of this motivation - at the end of the day business is business

Such an attitude towards satisfying the locals first was not demonstrated when reducing the student budget - a mere pittance in comparison with the

potential income to be had from tourism.

A tour operator told me that a frequently asked question is. "Doesn't your government take tourism seriously?" It must be embarrassing for operators to be in one breath promoting the beauty and wildlife opportunities of these Islands and with the next apologising for the fact that the tourist won't actually be able to experience these wonders unless they are prepared to stay at least one night at a destination.

FIGAS have provided a fantastic (but subsidised) service to the local community for many years which I don't want to knock, but we have to face facts. The accent should now be more on making money to supplement the lack of fishing revenue, not using our finances to provide on occasion self-

indulgent services to the community.

The service will never run at a profit but it certainly wouldn't hurt to reduce the subsidy. Farmers are being 'weaned' off their subsidies and the emphasis is on business management, a move that is being embraced and is giving them motivation and pride in their achievements. Perhaps the same attitude should be adopted by FIG; it's possible a level of complacency has developed over the years within many areas which now need to be addressed.

SAMA82 works on 25th commemorations

THE Chairman of the South Atlantic Medal Association says he has "taken a modicum of comfort" from a defence minister's comments in Parliament about commemorations planned for the 25th anniversary of the Falklands War

Martin Reed wrote to the Minister for the Armed Forces, Adam Ingram, in March this year regarding 2007.

He received a reply from the Personal Secretary of Ivor Caplin. Minister for Veterans, who confirmed that, "..."the Government will be considering sponsoring a commemoration of the 25th anniversary of the end of the conflict in the UK.

"At this stage (April 6) options centring on a parade and service in London are being considered by the Armed Forces.

Mr Reed also spoke to John Sinfield, Chairman of the Ministry of Defence Committee on Commemorations, who said that he had put in a bid for money for the commemoration but that he had not yet received a reply.

Mr Reed said Mr Sinfield also said that they were presently only considering sponsored event in the UK, however with the Heroes' Return programme! operating for the end of WWII. there could be a,

"...new range of possibilities for the Islands."

More specifically, Mr Reed says no one has discussed arrangements for the families of those who died, "...so I will write again to see what is in the Ministerial mind."

In the meantime, he said he takes "a modicum of comfort" from Ivor Caplin's final sentiments in parliament last week (as reported by Penguin News.)

"So funding would appear to be available, but details of what is envisaged are not yet on the table."

FALKLANDS farmers heard an unequivocal message from visiting Australian stud farmer Graham Gilmore last week - meat is the future for sheep farmers

Mr Gilmore and Mario Aishemberg from Tattykeel Stud in Oberon, New South Wales, also work in Uruguay and are now expanding their business into Chile

They spent last week touring the Falklands, and did, of course, have a vested interest in the promotion of meat farming they were there to market semen and embryos from their prime heavy lamb Poll Dorset and Texel Plus stock.

The pair toured farms on the East and West and also made a presentation at the Chamber of Commerce in Stanley, where Mr Gilmore told farmers that the breeds offered rapid growth rate, leanness, easy lambing. and superior taste and tenderness.

He also urged farmers to embrace the opportunities offered to them by the new abattoir at Sand Bay. The facility processed 21.400 sheep in the last killing season, up from 15,400 the previous year, but while its output may be growing, the operation is still subsidised by FIDC

Mr Gilmore commented: "If I was farming in the Falklands I wouldn't like to be relying on wool without an abattoir there - I'd like both In Australia we have got problems with lack of abattoirs. The abattoir you've got here is being creative to help you. Our abattoirs are being creative to make money for somebody else, not for us

'In South America the abattoir owners are in it for themselves. There's not many abattoirs around the world that will keep going and making a loss, they'll just close. You are lucky that you have an abattoir that's been set up to try and help the individual.

But, he added, it is not only in the Falklands that meat is increasing in importance: "I think the future of the sheep industry worldwide is focusing more on meat then wool - that's just a fact of life. I've been 44 years in the stud game We've spent many years with the Merino companies doing better than we have and the tide has turned.

Mr Gilmore said his Falklands tour had been "a very quick learning experience," and that the isolation of the Islands was familiar from his own experiences on the family farm at Tattykeel

He urged farmers to be flexible and not be daunted by the challenge of change: "We've got problems just like you've got problems here: we do all our own shearing, we build all our own sheds, we build what we can of our own houses. If we have got a friend who's an electrician, we barter with them

Whatever the problem is, we don't look at the negative aspect, we look at the positive Compared to many parts of Australia for producing what we are, we're in the wrong location But the advantage that we have is that when we sell from a cold climate to a hot climate the sheep jump out of their skins and do really well. It's a common thing that farmers will say 'Hang on, we can't do that because of this, this and this'. But if we are not doing well we've got to look at something new" John Fowler (MP)

Disqualification for daytime drink driver

A STANLEY woman lost her licence for eighteen months after she drove while drunk

Veronica Summers pleaded guilty to the charge of drink driving when she appeared before the Senior Mag-

istrate on Wednesday.

Prosecutor Ros Cheek told the court that police received a report in the early afternoon on Friday, October 29, that Mrs Summers appeared to be intoxicated at work and was likely to drive

At approximately 4.35pm she was seen by police driving down Ross Road and parking in the Capstan Gift Shop. She was approached by a police officer who smelled alcohol. The police officer told Mrs Summers about the information received earlier in the afternoon and she admitted that she had had a drink at lunchtime. She failed a road side breath test and later gave a positive breath sample at the police station, with a lower reading of 69 micrograms of alcohol per 100 millilitres of breath analysed. The legal limit is 35mg.

In court, Mrs Summers offered no explanation for her behaviour.

The Senior Magistrate, Mrs Clare

Foulds, told the defendant she viewed the offence as "serious." She told Mrs Summers, "...you were driving on a road in the middle of town when

there were many people about."

She banned Mrs Summers from driving for eighteen months and ordered her to pay a £600 fine, plus prosecution costs of £70.

Also in court on Wednesday was Mr Geoffrey Loftus who had earlier pleaded guilty by post to a speeding offence; he was accused of travelling on his motorcycle at 37 miles an hour in a 25 mile zone.

As he had previous convictions for traffic related offences Mr Loftus faced a driving disqualification.

He presented references from both his employer and the Chief Fire Officer. After considering these, the Senior Magistrate said Mr Loftus was in the "fortunate position" of the two referees wanting him to keep his licence. She said this showed Mr Loftus was "not always irresponsi-

She fined Mr Loftus £200 for the offence and ordered him to pay £70 prosecution costs.

'Meat is the future,' farmers told | Ship security meets deadline

CONTRARY to what photogaph (right) might appear to show, Councillor John Birmingham has avoided having to eat his hat.

At a public meeting earlier this year, Councillor Birmingham, who holds the tourism portfolio, said, "...l will eat my hat," if the new security facilities on the public jetty were not ready for the arrival of the first cruise ship of the season.

However, the screening centre was in fact up and running for Tuesday's arrival of the Amsterdam. Under Security of Life at Sea (SOLAS) rules, one in ten passengers returning to their ship must be screened by security staff.

On Tuesday afternoon Councillor Birmingham told Penguin News, "There was a lot of sceptism that the jetty wouldn't be ready but it all looks fine."

Staff at the Public Works Department's Design Office presented Councillor Birmingham with his 'hat', in the form of a sponge cake.

Director of Falklands Tourism, Connie Stevens, spoke to passengers and crew from the Amsterdam about the security measures. She said, "...the passengers were obviously not aware that this is the first year of this new system for us here in the Falkland Islands, and those I spoke to all simply said that they are accustomed to this wherever they go. "They certainly do accept that the security measures are necessary and it makes them feel safer about taking a holiday on a cruise ship knowing that security is taken seriously in sea ports."

Mrs Stevens said the crew members she spoke to, who are aware that it is a new system for the Falklands.

said the building and structures on the Public Jetty do not look "out of place" and they were also very comfortable with the systems that the Falkland Islands have put in place.

At no time during the day was there any delay caused by the new system, and the passengers did not object in any way to being stopped and 'screened' prior to their depar-ture from the Jetty."

Mrs Stevens spoke to a number of passengers as they returned from their tours: "They had thoroughly enjoyed their visit to the Falklands. There are clearly some opportunities to convert a few of these passengers to return for a land-based holiday.

"A large proportion are 'cruisers' through and through, but there is still a proportion of these day-trippers who, if they have a fantastic time during their short stay here and are made aware of all the amazing opportunities that the Falklands has to offer the visitor, might return for a longer holiday."

Night checks discourage speeders

POLICE have been undertaking speed checks mainly after dark which has resulted in a drop in speeding.

They now have the equipment to conduct checks in any areas whereas previously checks could only be carried out in illuminated

Experience Sea Lion Island in a day

TRAVEL to a wildlife mecca by helicopter, observe elephant seals with their harems and pups and, more than likely, witness pods of Orca basking off-shore before strolling to a comfortable lodge for melt-in-your-mouth cream cakes and tea. All in one day:

Sound good? It is.

This season Sulivan Shipping Services in conjunction with British International helicopters are offering this unique trip to tourists for the first time and already the six scheduled tours are fully booked by cruiselines.

In an effort to trial-run the tour Sulivan Shipping and British International invited a group of tour operators and one lucky journalist to undertake the tour so that everyone from wild life guides to the staff at Sea Lion Lodge could fine tune the operation. ensuring visitors get as much as possible from the trip.

So, on a slightly overcast day a couple of weeks ago, we all arrived in good time at the Jetty Centre, ready for our excursion to Sea Lion Island.

Sulivan Shipping Services Tourism Development Manager, Debbie Summers, the driving force behind the idea, explained that she has been working on the concept of day trips to Sea Lion Island for two years. Many obstacles had to be overcome before she arrived at the tidy package now on offer, to not only cruise ship tourists, but any one who would

like to take part in the Sea Lion Island experience.

The tour is for groups of 16 and is four and a half hours long with a scenic forty minute flight from Stanley Airport to the island and back, complete with informed commentary from the flight crew.

During our bus ride to Stanley Airport Amanda Morris of Falklands Conservation gives a polished talk about what we will be doing and seeing, hands out tips on the country side code and manages to answer our questions. Before we know it, it's time to board the helicopter.

On arrival at the grass airstrip at Sea Lion Island we get into tourist mode and ask lots of questions of the wildlife expert, Falklands Conservation's Tim Reid who leads our

meandering party

We are probably the group from hell, as we wander along and peer over cliff edges, some falling behind while trying to capture the best photo of striated caracara and taking little notice of Tim hollering at us to wait for the rest of the group. However along the way we offer suggestions for making the guide's job easier and the experience even better for the tourists.

Conservation's Sarah Clement is 'twitching' (bird spotting) madly and compiling a list of her sightings; Dotterels, Grass wrens, Magellanic Snipe and Plovers are all spotted on the fairly brisk walk which takes us to the HMS Sheffield Memorial overlooking a large colony of Rockhopper penguins and King Comorants; as we pause the tiny Tussac Birds bounce around our feet in hope of a dropped crumb or titbit.



They are a naturally inquisitive bird whose tame nature has been to their detriment in other parts of the Falklands. Sea Lion Island is cat and rat free so the Tussac Birds thrive and keep us company for most of the walk.

We are not fortunate enough to see the Orca (Killer Whales) on our jaunt around the coast but the scenery is stunning and more than compensates for their absence.

A wonderfully sheltered pond nestled in the tussac yields more wildlife wonders for Sarah's list: Speckled and Silver Teal, Patagonian Crested Duck and Silver Grebes.

Next stop is Elephant Corner where we sit in amazing close proximity to several large male Elephants Seals; these monsters can weigh up to 3.5 tonnes and are 4.5m long. The pupping season is underway and tiny vulnerable baby seals with huge eyes run the risk of being flattened by these enormous creatures. Personal hygiene is not high on their list of priorities so it pays to remain up wind when possible.

The group is now given the option of wandering around North East

Point where there is also an abundance of elephant seals, staying where they are or heading up to the lodge for tea, coffee and sticky buns.

It is hoped to have about an hour to spare with each tour at this point to give the group a bit of freedom although the rest of the tour has to be fairly well regimented to fit everything in.

Most of us have a bit of a wander around but, as none are paying tourists, the lure of cream cakes is soon greater than the seal and we make our way to the large lodge.

It's worth it; even the most determined dieters of the group are soon slurping contentedly at tea and licking cream off their fingers.

As with many activities in the Falklands, these trips to Sca Lion Island are weather dependant but as cruise ships tend to cancel if winds exceed 45 knots, it works well with the limitations of British International's helicopters.

Debbie Summers is excited about the project: "This is the way of things to come for the development of tourism within the Falkland Is-


experience will undoubtedly be the highlight of a South American cruise typically offered."

News from Executive Council's October meeting

Language fluency affects status

FURTHER consideration has been given to the coverage of "fluency in the English language" and "commitment to the Falkland Islands" on the revised application form for Falkland Islands Status.

ExCo considered a revised form at its meeting on October 28 and agreed to adopt the amendments proposed in the final version of the form.

The revised form stresses that applicants must have sufficient command of the English language for "the ordinary needs of life" however "...an inability to speak English well will not necessarily disqualify you, or mean that your dependants cannot join you in the Falkland Islands."

A person who enjoys Falkland Islands status is, under the Constitution of the Falkland Islands, a person regarded as belonging to the Falkland Islands. Falkland Islands status can be granted under section 4 of the Falkland Islands Status Ordinance 1998 by the Governor of the Falkland Islands on the advice of the Executive Council.

A person who is granted Falkland Islands status will, provided that he continues to meet the residence qualifications under the Electoral Ordinance 1988, be entitled to have his name placed upon the Electoral Register for the constituency in which he lives and will no longer be subject to immigration control of any kind.

ExCo decides 'no minimum wage'

NO minimum wage is to be introduced in the Falklands.

The merits of introducing a minimum wage and employment conditions have been discussed by Executive Council.

A paper was considered, which had been prepared following consultation with the Chamber of Commerce, the Rural Business Association, representatives of the Ministry of Defence and employers at MPA.

The paper recommended that legislation imposing a minimum wage, "...be not introduced for the

time being at least but that a report on minimum wage and working condition-related issues be prepared annually by the Head of Policy with the next due in September 2005."

His Excellency the Governor reported that ExCo agreed with this, "...and decided there is no need at this point to introduce legislation on a minimum wage.

"The subject would however continue to be discussed with interested parties, and the situation would be reviewed in September 2005."

Teenagers to take over exchange building



EXECUTIVE Council has recognised there is a lack of facilities in Stanley for young people in the 13 to 17 age group and has decided to offer the old telephone exchange building to the Community Centre Committee for use as a youth club.

The club will be run by a com-

mittee of young people with the support of some adults.

Mr Pearce reported, "It was agreed that a lease should be offered for a nine-month period until the middle of next year, at which point the arrangements would be reviewed in order to judge the success of the project."

Pencil Lane is the new junior school road

THE name of the new road running alongside the Infant and Junior School has been decided.

Pupils at the Infant and Junior School had been invited by the Stanley Lands Committee to make suggestions and, according to the Governor, they produced some "very imaginative" proposals.

ExCo agreed to accept the Lands Committee's recommendation of Pencil Lane.

Changes to election legislation

EXECUTIVE Councillors have considered four items of draft legislation at their latest meeting, including a Bill to amend the Electoral Ordinance.

With a General Election due in just over a year the Bill addresses a number of issues which need to be resolved in time before the next General Election.

His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce said, "The Bill includes provisions covering the establishment of a polling station in Stanley for Camp residents when a by-election takes place in Camp only, the preparation of a "rolling" register of electors, instead of the annual preparation of the register at a fixed date; more generous provision to enable Falkland Islanders living temporarily away from the Islands to vote in a General Election (this will be a particular benefit to those who are obtaining experience in employment overseas); and provision for persons who are absent in the United Kingdom to send completed postal ballot papers to the Falkland Islands Government Office in London.

"The Bill will also appoint the Chief Executive as Returning Officer at future elections. ExCo considered this to be an appropriate arrangement because of the very heavy responsibility which the Returning Officer has to carry.

"It is also in line with the arrangements operated at elections

in the United Kingdom."

The Bill is being published for local consultation, and members of the public are invited to send in their views. Mr Pearce said it will be considered further at the November meeting of Executive Council, and again if necessary at ExCo's December meeting, with a view to its introduction in Legislative Council in late January 2005.

Three further pieces of legislation were considered by Executive Council.

Mr Pearce reported. "The Education (Amendment) Bill 2004 is designed to amend the Education Ordinance in order to enable the school summer vacation to begin closer to Christmas and to last a little longer. This is in response to a number of representations received from parents.

"The Taxes (Amendment) Bill 2004 introduces four amendments to the Taxes Ordinance 1997. These concern the taxation of forestry, the timetable for the provision of POAT end of year certificates, the maintenance of business records, and the taxation of government employees recruited in the Falkland Islands and working in the Falkland Islands Government Office in London.

"The Media Trust (Amendment) Bill 2004 raises the ceiling on the number of trustees of the Media Trust from five to nine. These three bills will be remitted to the meeting of Legislative Council at the end of November."

£250,000 ceiling on Landholdings overdraft

A CEILING of £250,000 on Falklands Landholdings' (FLH) overdraft has been authorised until the end of the current financial year, ExCo has agreed.

Also considered by ExCo was the structure of the FLH Board, the following conclusions were reached:

- The membership should include two councillors, one of whom will be Chairman.
- ExCo appointed Councillor Richard Cockwell to be Chairman,

and Councillor Mike Summers to be member;

- The Chief Executive should be Executive Vice-Chairman;
- The General Manager of Falklands Landholdings should be a member;
- The members representing the farming community should be Ben Berntsen (Elephant Beach) and Donna Minnell (Moss Side);
- Ron Binnie should represent the Rural Business Association on the Board.

Broadcasting Station's future plans progress

ARRANGEMENTS for the future management of the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station (FIBS) are progressing.

At its meeting last week ExCo considered a paper about the transfer of management of FIBS to the Media Trust which has already been agreed in principle.

The Governor reported that ExCo reached three conclusions: "First, it reaffirmed its commitment to maintain financial support to FIBS to enable it to continue its present role and function; secondly it agreed to request the Gen-



eral Manager of FIDC to provide assistance to secure the transfer of FIBS to the Media Trust by June 30, 2005 at the latest; and finally ExCo requested the Attorney General to prepare the necessary legislative amendments."

STANLEY'S Museum staff continue to be kept busy with a number of projects steadily progressing.

PastFinders, a group for youngsters aged between 7 and 14, has attracted interest from a good number of children who are now signed up and participating in activities.

Although the winter weather has kept the group indoors, a number of outings are planned for the warmer

PastFinders, sponsored by Fortuna Ltd. aims to teach youngsters traditional skills and pastimes as well as teaching them about the history of the Falklands. A limited number of places are available, but please contact Colin at the Museum for more information.

Also progressing well is the Museum's work on oral history. The Museum now has a digital recorder and will soon be starting a new oral history project, recording the memories and stories of the older genera-tion in the Falklands. Museum Manager. Leona Roberts says, "Anyone who is interested in helping, either with interviewing or transcribing, should contact the Museum - equally 'nominations' for interviewees would be welcomed!

The Trust has recently received two very generous donations towards restoration work on the Jhelum and

A cheque for £350 from Cable and Wireless was presented by outgoing Customer Services Manager, Emma Edwards; and the youngsters of the Community School have come up trumps again, gathering another £83.90 for the Museum (earraised by Tim Simpson's Year 12 and

funded work on the *Jhelum*).

Mrs Roberts said, "The Trust is a registered Falklands charity and while it receives a subsidy from Government to cover running costs, funds for projects have to be found elsewhere.

This year Government have agreed to match, pound for pound up to £25,000, any funds raised towards work on wrecks and hulks.

Entry fees to the Museum have been increased from £2.50 to £3.00. However, Mrs Roberts says, "...this price will now include entry to Cartmell Cottage, so is less of an increase and more of an adjustment."

She adds, "By becoming a Friend of the Trust you will be entitled to unlimited free access to the Museum and Cartmell Cottage as well as receiving a free gift and a number of

additional benefits.

Mrs Roberts says the Falkland Islands Museum and National Trust has a vacancy for a Trustee and would be interested to hear from anyone who would like to become involved with the work of the Museum. Trustees meetings are held approximately every 6-8 weeks and a Trustee is usually appointed for a three year pe-

Busy time for Museum staff 'Indefensible' delay is defended

THE Government Secretary has responded to an article in last week's Penguin News which reported councillors as saying the non-allocation of the former EOD building on Ross Road is "indefensible"

Peter King says the article, " flects badly on the Secretariat."

He explained the problem from his staff's point of view: "The EOD building was handed back to Government (FIG) at the end of March. In April FIG departments were invited to make bids for its use.

Owing to unavoidable absences overseas the final analysis of Government bids was not completed until June 30. However, on May 26 expressions of interest from the public were invited, with a closing date of June 18, and seven were received.

There then followed a period when the bids were evaluated and further information sought from inter-

ested parties.

In late August, Mr King says, "Councillors indicated, via the Chief Executive, that their preference was that the building be utilised for a tourism-related purpose. Letters to the unsuccessful bidders were thus sent on September 6, one of which was for the use of the building as a Community Centre/Drop-in Centre for the youth of Stanley.
"Negotiations then continued

with commercial, tourism-related bidders, a building survey undertaken. and detailed terms for the lease of the building were being refined."

However, in September Councillors received a petition from youngsters from years 10 and 11 at the Community School asking that their bid - supported by responsible adults

 to use the building be reconsidered.
 Mr King says Executive Council therefore in September, "...agreed that a full paper on the proposed uses of the EOD building should be presented at their October meeting. including the restated bid from Years 10 and 11 at the FICS.

"A paper was duly presented and Council agreed that the building could

be made available to the Community Centre Group on a trial basis to June 30, 2005 and we are currently working to facilitate their use of the building as soon as possible; this includes drawing up a trust deed and a lease. The delay in allocating this building is regretted, however it was due to a number of factors which were, arguably, unplanned and unavoidable.

The Penguin News article also touched on the government tender-ing process and the time taken to advise tenderers of the outcome of their bids.

Mr King says, "Whilst the Secretariat always makes every effort to decide on tenders at the earliest opportunity, some tenders are more straightforward than others.

The time taken to consider tenders depends, for example, on the number of tenders received, the availability of officers to sit on a tender board, the need to check calculations and perform other analysis/evaluation of the bid/s, whether any bids require clarification or provision of further information by the tenderer, and the number of meetings of a tender board to complete consideration of tenders received."

Mr King said an analysis of the last twelve tender exercises reveals that tenderers were written to advising them of the outcome of their bids

(a) in four days or less in four instances:

(b) between five and 14 days in five instances

(c) between 15 and 21 days in

two instances; and

(d) in 31 days in one instance. Mr King said that to the end of June 2004 the Assistant Secretary, Simon Goss, managed tender boards (and boards of surveys) as a part of his job, but he has now left the Secretariat and has not been replaced; those tasks have therefore been shared amongst other officers as available and need to fit in with other priorities.

Food shortages threaten Antarctic wildlife

ANTARCTIC whales, seals and penguins could be threatened by food shortages in the Southern Ocean, according to the British Antarctic Sur-

Numbers of Antarctic krill (Euphausia superba), a shrimp-like crustacean at the heart of the food chain, are declining. The most likely explanation is a dramatic decline in sea-ice. The results are published this week in the journal Nature.

Sea-ice is a vital feeding ground for the huge number of krill in the Southern Ocean. The new research shows that krill numbers have dropped by about 80% since the 1970's. Less sea-ice during the winter is likely to be the cause and may explain declines seen in several species of penguins.

There was previous speculation that krill stocks might have declined. Four years ago BAS started an international collaborative project to widen the time- and space-scales of sample coverage.

Nine of the countries working in Antarctica pooled their data spanning 40 Antarctic summers, over the period 1926 to 2003. They allow for the first time a large-scale view of change across the Southern

Lead author Dr Angus Atkinson from British Antarctic Survey (BAS) says, "This is the first time that we have understood the full scale of this decline. Krill feed on the algae found under the surface of the sea-ice, which acts as a kind of 'nursery'

The Antarctic Peninsula, a key breeding ground for the krill, has warmed by 2.5°C in the last 50 years, with a striking decrease in sea-ice.

We don't fully understand how the loss of sea-ice here is connected to the warming, but we believe that it could be behind the decline in krill."

The implications are commercial as well as scientific, as the Southem Ocean is a valuable resource for fisheries. Thousands of tourists are also attracted to Antarctica to enjoy the spectacular wildlife, most of which feed on krill.

A spokesperson for BAS said, "By knowing how the environment affects this unique food web, we can predict how it will respond to future change.'





Locums, a new doctor and dentistry

FURTHER staff changes to locum General Practitioners (GPs) were announced at the Health and Medical Services committee meeting held on Monday.

Director of Health, Norman McGregor Edwards, said that the present locum, Dr Denise Hannell will complete her time at the end of this week and will be replaced by South African trained Dr Amaran Moodley for one month who in turn will be replaced by Dr Albert Boshoff until February 2005.

In a paper to the Committee Mr McGregor Edwards outlined the world wide shortage of doctors, particularly GPs in the UK. The short term response to this crisis he said has seen rapid increases in UK GP salaries and additional incentives which include, "golden hello's, golden handcuffs and no on call."

Mr McGregor Edwards said that consequently there have been feelings among some FIG Health Service doctors that FIG pay rates no longer bear any comparison to UK rates.

Over the last three years various unsuccessful submissions by GPs have sought on-call payments and an uplift of 25% in salaries to compensate for on call and raise salaries to market rates. Mr McGregor Edwards said, "...currently GPs are paid within the Grade A/A1 salary scale (£35k - £53/£53k - £65k).

"A recent recruitment campaign for a contract officer GP has now brought the issue of pay comparability to a head. The post was advertised without mention of a salary level. The campaign produced only three applicants. Two of these were unsuitable on professional grounds, but if appointed would have been asking for salaries in the order of £80k to £120k plus contract officer benefits."

Mr Mcgregor Edwards said the successful applicant from New Zealand has settled for a salary within the approved grade range, but above that paid to the more

experienced holders of similar posts (and the Deputy Chief Medical Officer) plus contract officer benefits. "His arrival in February therefore immediately creates an imbalance in pay," said Mr McGregor Edwards, adding, "The differential with the Chief Medical Officer will have been seriously eroded."

Mr McGregor Edwards said the purpose of his report is to, "...alert the Health and Medical Services Committee to the issue. It is one that requires examination across FIG and a report will be submitted to Executive Council in due course."

Mr McGregor Edwards also presented a progress report on the future of Camp dentistry.

The report contains options to ensure that Camp residents continue to have access to high quality dentistry in the forthcoming years.

Mr McGregor Edwards said these include the replacement of fixed dental surgeries and the use of mobile dental surgeries mounted on vehicles. He said, "The High-lands and Islands of Scotland as well as some urban areas of the UK have similar problems to us in delivering healthcare to remote locations. We have therefore sought the advice of the Chief Dental Officer for Scotland," he added, "It is understood his reply is imminent but is not yet to hand. Once all the necessary information has been assembled a further paper, outlining the alternatives will be submitted to the HMSC.

Mr McGregor Edwards said the dental equipment and facilities at Fox Bay have deteriorated to the point where they do not reach modern clinical standards and are unsafe to use for both patients and staff, a situation, "...both dentist and engineer confirmed."

He continued, "This and the demise of the Fox Bay house means that we need to look again at the provision of dentistry to Camp. We have an opportunity to make a strategic decision on how Camp dental services should be provided in future."

Falklands rocks and fossils to be published

PROGRESS on a book about Falklands rocks and fossils has been pleasing, the director of Minerals and Agriculture says.

At the Mineral Resources Committee on Monday, Mrs Phyl Rendell showed the meeting a draft copy of the book which is due to be published by February.

Mrs Rendell said the concept of the geological book is a follow on from the success of three glossy brochures that have already been published and are proving very popular for residents and visitors alike. "It was felt that a 50 or so page book on the geology of the Islands would be a good way to distribute accurate information about the Islands' geology to those interested."

The content is therefore aimed at general interest readers and the publication will include a number of illustrations. Mrs Rendell said, "Visitors often comment that there are published accounts of some aspects of the Falklands and in a small way, we are trying to address that and capitalise on the 30,000 or so cruise ship passengers that will pass through Stanley and may like to buy a copy.

"Not many would want to by a geological map of the Islands at £20 or a technical report at £50 but a quality illustrated booklet for around £9 may fill the gap."

With some input from Emma Edwards and Dr Don Aldiss, the booklet is being compiled by Dr Phil Stone at the British Geological Survey.

Mrs Rendell says the book is, "...very much a personal interest project for him with much of the work being done in his own time."

Could Fire Brigade lose strength?



LOSING one fulltime fire fighter would have massive implications for the Service according to Chief Fire Officer Gardner Fiddes.

In a memorandum, which went before last week's Standing Finance Committee he explained that the daytime manning of the Stanley station comprises of the Chief Fire Officer, Station Commander and two fire fighters, saying that to lose one full time post would result in them being unable to respond to any incident until a retained member turns out.

This is because the appliances need a four-man crew. There would be a reduced or no helicopter fire cover during office hours. Statutory or other training in the UK would be difficult or impossible.

He pointed out a string of other services that would be lost or reduced; highlighting that this will result in poor morale leading to res-

ignations or stress -related illnesses.

In his report Mr Fiddes says that the service is currently allocated forty retained places with current staffing levels just allowing them to operate with thirty-two, a difference of £9.000 for full funding. He says his current estimate for thirty-two retained fighters is nearly £27,000, over £11,000 less than the full estimate for that number.

Chair of Standing Finance Committee. Councillor Mike Summers, says that the matter is going to be referred back to the Chief Executive and Deputy Financial Secretary so that they can have further talks with the Chief Fire Officer.

He says they'll be looking at the effects staff reductions would have on the service, as opposed to why it can't be done. (FIBS)





Falkland Islands Defence Force: 150 years of voluntary service

aggression from Russian warships and privateers during the Crimean War in 1854 Governor Rennie formed the first Falkland Islands volunteer force. The force, although not officially titled but sometimes called the 'Stanley Volunteers', was the forerunner of the Fakland Islands Volunteers, which subsequently became Falkland Islands Defence Force.

In June 1891 the Chilean steamer Maipo called at Port William. The vessel belonged to the revolutionary party in the Chilean civil war and called into Port William ostensibly to carry out engine repairs. Because the vessel

had over 200 fully armed soldiers and sailors on board it was considered a risk to the security of the Islands and Governor Sir Roger Goldsworthy therefore formed an armed body of volunteers called the Falkland Islands Volunteers. The first body of 37 volunteers was sworn in at Government House on June 13, 1892.

During the First World War the Colony of the Falkland Islands was placed on a war footing and the Falkland Islands Volunteers were mobilised for service in military outposts positioned around Stanley. On December 8, 1914 the smoke of a German fleet was spotted by one of the outposts and subsequently the outpost on Sappers Hill provided valuable information on the movement of the vessels. The end result was the resounding victory of the Battle of the Falklands.

During World War One 36 Falkland Islanders, many of them members of the FI Volunteers, enrolled with Her Majesty's Forces. Ten lost their lives during service overseas.

In 1919 the Volunteers were ordered to stand down. Later that year the name of the force was changed to the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF).

During World War Two the FIDF was again used to man military defensive outposts throughout the Islands. At this time the FIDF included a horse mounted rifle unit. As in WW1 the Falklands provided an impressive number of volunteers to join HM Forces. During the war the FIDF worked closely with the West Yorkshire Regiment (Prince of Wales Own) and the Royal Scots.

From 1952 until 1982 there was a Royal Marine (RM) presence in the Falkland Islands and the FIDF consequently adopted RM drill and a dress uniform similar to RM blues. From the mid sixties until 1982 the FIDF received training assistance from the Royal Marines.

On September 28, 1966 the Falkland Islands became the site of one of the world's first hijacking incidents. Nineteen armed Argentine extremists hijacked a DC4 aircraft during an internal flight in Argentina and landed on the Stanley Racecourse. Their in-

tention was to stage a symbolic invasion of the Falkland Islands. The Royal Marines and the FIDF, reinforced with ex-FIDF members and contractors, encircled the aircraft and, using a combination of food, water, heat and sleep deprivation tactics, forced the terrorists to surrender without loss of life.

Following this incident the FIDF was put on heightened alert and a section was held on permanent standby until February 1967.

In November 1968 a light aircraft from Argentina landed illegally on Eliza Cove Road – the FIDF was again deployed to contain the incursion, however this time the passengers were unarmed Argentine journalists.

On April 1, 1982 the FIDF was mobilised, along with Royal Marine Naval Party 8901, to defend the Falkland Islands from a full scale Argentine invasion.

On the morning of April 2 the Governor, Sir Rex Hunt, ordered the FIDF and Royal Marines to surrender. The Argentines seized all equipment belonging to the FIDF and declared it to be an illegal organization. Several members of the FIDF were arrested by the Argentines and sent to Fox Bay where they remained under house arrest until the Argentine surrender.

The FIDF was reformed in 1983. Today the FIDF is entirely funded by the Falkland Islands Government and follows British Army doctrine in training and operations. The Force is modelled on an infantry company (light role), and two of its main strengths are local knowledge and the capability of rapid deployment using Land Rovers, quad bikes and rigid raiders. Through a secondment arrangement with MOD the FIDF currently employs a Royal Marine WO2 as a

Permanent Staff Instructor.

Recent modernisation includes reconfiguring the Force into sniper/recce, machine gun, close combat, amphibious and logistic support units, coordinated by a central command. The Force supports the local community by providing a mountain rescue capability and trained search and rescue leave.

In 1999 members of the FIDF received training with Royal Navy es-

tablishments in the UK in the operation and maintenance of an Oerlikon 7 Alpha 20mm cannon, board and search and various other skills associated with fisheries protection duties. Subsequently the FIDF has given the Falkland Islands Government Fisheries Department the capability of mounting armed deterrence against illegal fishing activity within the Falkland Islands conservation zones.

The FIDF is armed with the Steyr AUG assault rifle and light support weapons system, together with GPMG's (general purpose machine guns) and .5 heavy machine guns.

The Force has excellent support equipment and night vision capability, together with a state-of-the-art communications system that has the capability of giving secure communications, global positioning system interface and in-field email.



Baby's first year of language: from 'wahhh' to 'wow'!

IN THE first year of life, a baby's communication ability progresses from that impossible to ignore newborn cry through to the ability to understand simple commands, recognise the meaning of common words and express themselves through gesture and those first exciting real words.

Although new born babies seem quite helpless, their senses of vision, touch and particularly hearing are relatively well developed and their brains are pre-wired to learn whatever language they are exposed to. Although they come into the world well equipped to learn their native language they need the help of an interactive and responsive environment. Here's a guide to what to expect

Birth to 3 months:

Infants can hear the characteristic rhythms and tones of their mother's voice while they are still in the womb. In the first few days of life, many newborns will turn to the sound of that voice. During the first three months, babies will give their first true smile in response to a familiar voice or face and become noticeably attentive when people talk to them. Babies love to hear the "baby talk" that adults tend to use naturally with babies and the exaggeration of the pitches and tonal characteristics of words actually helps them to tune in to the different sounds.

From birth to three months a baby will make eye contact with his carer when he is being fed. changed or cuddled. A newborn's visual skills are not yet mature but they can follow movement and focus well at a distance of about 9-12 inches from their face. Babies are especially attracted to faces and will study them quite intently and may even try to imitate some movements like sticking out a longue.

Touch in the form of gentle handling, stroking and massage is an especially valuable form of early communication that lets babies know their environment is safe and secure and helps the baby to form the strong attachments and trust that form the basis of future social relationships.

3 to 6 months:

Around 3 to 4 months of age babies branch out from their repertoire of different cries to produce a range of basic vowel sounds 'ah,ee,ai, oe, ue' and some consonants such as 'k' and 'g'. This stage is called "cooing". Babies of this age smile more spontaneously in response to attention and may also be observed to smile to themselves. From 4 to 6 months babies will fairly consistently turn to the sound

of a familiar voice and are starting to recognise and respond to their own names.

6 to 9 months:

From 6 to 9 months of age, babies continue to experiment with sound production, gradually increasing the range of sounds they can make. They start to put them together into connected strings of syllables with intonation patterns like 'gu gu, da da'. This stage is known as 'babbling'. At this age, they may also use gestures and will try to copy sounds and words you show them. If a child does not progress from the cooing to the babbling stage and instead vocalises less and less, this can be an indication of significant hearing difficulties and assessment and advice should be sought.

9 to 12 months:

The next step in a baby's speech development is known as 'jargon'. Jargon consists of long strings of babbled syllables with a variety of sounds and intonation patterns and it sounds very much like it could be some sort of foreign language. Indeed you may recognise a real word or two in amongst the jargon. Babies of this age also begin to copy more environmental sounds such as 'vrrm' like a car or 'moo' like a cow and will try to copy words you say. Although they can generally understand simple commands such as 'no' or 'don't touch' they may not always comply or remember from one time to the next.

First words usually begin to appear around one year of age but children progress at individual rates and some will be a few months earlier or later.

How you can help your baby develop language and communication skills

Talk to your baby as often as you can. Look directly at him and speak słowly and clearly. Especially during care giving times, tell him what you are doing when you are changing and feeding him. Show him things and tell him what they are. Draw your child's attention to sounds in the environment and what they mean - cat meowing or daddy's car in the driveway

Talk to your infant, even if you don't think everything you say will be understood. Hearing your words over and over in different contexts helps the baby's brain develop the connections that are necessary to fine-tune the auditory (hearing) system.

Hold turn taking conversations with your baby right from the start. When you speak to her, wait and give her time to make some sort of response. Before babies can use

words to express needs, they can only use crying and body language to indicate feelings or wants. Pay attention to your child's cues and body signals (body movements, eye gaze, crying, gestures, pushing away or grasping) and respond to these as if they were spoken words.

Sing songs and watch for his response. Babies can become more vocal when they are in a good mood i.e. after they are fed and will often respond positively to your attempts to engage them in turn taking conversation

Repeat the sounds that the child makes. Encourage vocal play and join in. Do finger plays and nursery rhymes with your child and help them learn the actions. Play peek a boo and other games that have a consistent structure. Babies feel a great sense of accomplishment when they guess what is coming next and they are right!

Share books with your baby. Look for books with simple large pictures, bright colours and stiff cardboard or cloth pages. Plastic books for the bath are great fun for you and baby. Older babies of 6-12 months also like photo albums of family and friends.


The interaction that you have with your child in this first year of language learning provides a strong foundation for language development and later success in learning and school.

Speech therapists are most often involved with babies less than a year old if they have been born with a syndrome or significant difficulty that affects their oral - motor mechanism- that is the face, lips, tongue, and inside the mouth.

This could be a structural problem such as a cleft lip and/or palate or a neuromuscular problem such as cerebral palsy where there is muscle weakness or high or low tone. These babies often have trouble sucking or eating solid food and speech therapists will be involved in assessment and treatment of feeding as well as early speech difficulties.

Speech therapists are also involved with young babies when they are discovered to have significant hearing difficulties. Early diagnosis and intervention can make a huge difference to the progress these children make in speech and language development.

Be alert for any signs that your child is not hearing as well as they should and if you have any concerns about your baby's speech and language development, seek assessment and advice from your doctor, infant health visitor or speech therapist.

Wool report - week ending October 30 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices in Australia, New Zealand and South Africa were generally up slightly for fleece wool lots finer than approximately 27 micron, but down marginally for 'broader" lots

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide", gains were generally of the order of 3 to 6 pence per kilogram clean, while losses at the broader end of the micron spectrum were in the range 2 to 3 pence

per kilogram clean.

The strength of the Australian, New Zealand and South African currencies relative to the US \$ continued to impact on the worlds wool markets. As an example the Australian dollar traded at almost 75 American cents for most of last week. Such high values relative to the US\$, unfortunately places heavy pressure on Chinese buying activity and impedes gains in the market.

In spite of currency pressures, general buying interest has been strong enough around the world (Europe, Korea, India) to create demand for raw wool and to lead

to the small gains observed.
In New Zealand last week there was a 78% clearance of the 13,300 bales on offer, in South Africa 95% of the 8,167 bales offered while in Australia 89% of the 41,601 bales presented to the trade were sold.

the New Zealand clip, and the "softer" market for such wool's, would explain the relatively poor clearance rates in New Zealand.



Bush to visit Chile on November 19

UNITED States Ambassador in Chile Craig Kelly confirmed that President George Bush will be visiting the country on November 19 when the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation sum-

Ambassador Kelly said, "Latinamerica is an important priority for President Bush.

President Bush is interested in the region, "...we're working to confirm details of the meetings to be held in Santiago," adding, it is, "...a clear indication of the very close link between Chile and United States

Ambassador Kelly also anticipated that with US elections over, "it will be possible to advance and achieve the Free Trade Association of the Americas initiative" with an efficient negotiation process.

South Atlantic hake dispute ends in court

AN Argentine federal judge has repealed a lower court appeal which allowed several vessels to fish common hake (Merluccius hubbsi) despite having exceeded the total allowable catch (TAC) established by the Argentine Fisheries authorities. Furthermore the federal judge ordered the company owning those vessels to be sanctioned.

The lifting of the judicial appeal had been a request to the Federal Court of Ushuaia by Chubut province State Attorney Jorge Miquelarena Vessels Api II, Api II and Antartida, belonging to the Argentine branch of the Spanish company based in Vigo, Iberconsa must now remain in port for more than a month and their cargoes seized. The company was fined EUR 24,000

Flowever Iberconsa's managers insist that the precautionary measure extended by Rawson City Federal Judge Miguel Angel Guidici, granted them permission to continue catching common hake in Argentine waters despite having exceeded the TAC. Sources interviewed by the newspaper La Voz de Galicia, said the vessels continued to operate despite the ruling

"The risk exists that the 405,000 tonnes hake TAC forecasted for 2004 would become exhausted before December thus caus-

ing damage to inland plants, which would run out of input," argued Mr Miquelarena.

Prior to the ruling issued by the Federal Justice, State Attorney Miquelarena said that the resource shortage is forcing implementation of "objective management measures" to prevent its collapse. These measures, "...mean reducing fishing vessels efforts to protect the general interest.

In his request to the Ushuaia Federal Judge, Mr Miquelarena claimed that ignoring regulations issued by national authorities for the sustainability of the common hake fisheries was "irrational"

Chubut province Governor Mario Das Neves also joined the controversy and in a statement to the local press claimed the, "...existence of spurious fisheries interests, which came from abroad and pretend to legitimize an economic activity resorting to shameful rulings authorised by certain judges.

"We have declared this kind of activity illegal and we will continue to talk with stakeholders in order to find a common ground. The objective of all of us is conservation and sustainability of the fisheries so that a majority of our citizens may have stable employment," underlined Mr Mario Das Neves. (FIS/MP).



CLAIMING A PENSION

Contributors to the Retirement Pensions Fund (previously known as the Old Age Pensions Fund) are reminded to claim a pension upon reaching the age of 64 years. For widows and widowers a pension may be claimed upon reaching the age of 60 years. Claim to Pension forms can be obtained from the Pensions Office at the Treasury.

APPLYING FOR CONTRIBUTION CREDITS

It is compulsory for all persons resident in the Falkland Islands between the ages of 17 to 64, and who have earnings in excess of the current limit of £160 per week, to contribute to the Fund. It is important for all contributors to have as full a pension record as possible. An incomplete pension record will result in only a partial pension at retirement. Any person who considers they are unable to afford making contributions is advised to contact the Pensions Officer at the Treasury to see if they are eligible to apply to the Board of Management for assistance. Under certain circumstances the Government will pay contributions on behalf of contributors. To be eligible a person must be earning less than the current limit of £160 per week and:

• entitled to a family allowance, or
• entitled to an attendance (carer's) allowance, or
• unable to work due to ill health, or
• following a prescribed course of education/training, or
• actively seeking employment.

Please note that, for Camp residents, a special scheme for assistance is in place as part of the Government's rural development policy. Further information on this scheme can be obtained by contacting the Pensions Office at the Treasury.

Man charged with child sex assault

AN East Falkland farmhand has been charged by police with sexually assaulting a child.

Robert William Smith of Goose Green was charged on Monday with two offences as a result of a serious incident which has been under investigation for several months

The two charges are assault of a child under 13 by penetration and assault occassioning actual bodily

Mr Smith appeared at Stanley Magistrates Court on Monday, shortly after being charged. He entered no pleas to the charges and was granted bail with a number of strict conditions

He must reside at 10 Goose Green, must not approach or communicate either in person or through a third party with four named prosecution witnesses and he has surrendered his passport to the Royal Falkland Islands Police.

Mr Smith must notify the Police of his intention to and proposed time of travel to Stanley or any other place outside Goose Green Farm.

He may not permit any person under the age of 16 to enter 10 Goose Green; in addition he may not approach any person under the age of 16 or remain alone in any room or vehicle with any person under the

Government loses Forbes appeal

THE government has lost its appeal against Acting Supreme Court Judge Nick Sanders' 2003 ruling on the Gordon Forbes case.

The appeal was launched by the government against a decision to dismiss its application for an order setting aside the part award given by the arbitrator on November 6,

The government, in its application to set aside for serious irregularity, was required to show that a serious irregularity affected the Tribunal, the proceedings or the award, and that substantial injustice had been caused as a result.

The appeal was considered by a panel of three judges: Mr Justice Appleby, Mr Justice Benson and Mr Justice Rubery

In his judgement, Mr Justice Appleby said he could not be satisfied that the government had been unfairly deprived of an opportunity to present its case or to make a case, "...which, if the misrepresentation had been known, might realistically have lead to a significantly different outcome.

The misrepresentation to which Justice Appleby referred was that the contractor was Gordon Forbes Construction (Falklands) Ltd. when in fact documentation later established that Gordon Forbes (Elgin) Ltd had been the contrac-

He said that whether or not there was a serious irregularity was not of significance, "...when I am satisfied that no substantial injustice has been caused to the Appellants and accordingly this appeal must fail."

Regarding the award of costs, Justice Appleby said that in the normal course of events it follows that the government would be liable for all the costs of this appeal however, "... I am satisfied that had it not been for the conduct of the Respondent (Forbes) in the appeal and his advisors...the litigation would not have got this far.

"Accordingly, I consider it equitable that there will be no order

When asked whether the government would continue its battle with Forbes, a spokesperson for the Falkland Islands Government said, "This matter will be reported to the Executive Council when the further conduct of this matter will, no doubt, be reviewed.

Second adjournment for fishing court case

FALKLANDS Councillor and Director of Quark Fishing Ltd. Michael Summers, was in Stanley Magistrate's court on Wednesday to hear his legal representative. Hugh Ferguson of Ledingham Chalmers, petition for a further adjournment of cases against his company, which first came to court on October 13.

Senior Magistrate. Clare Faulds. agreed to adjourn the cases until December 1 after hearing from Mr Ferguson that the late arrival of relevant papers in the Falkland Islands had prevented him from being in a position to form a plea. Crown Counsel, Ros Cheek confirmed the late arrival of the papers and indicated that the prosecution had no objections to the granting of a further adjournment.

Ouark Fishing Ltd, as the charterers of fishing vessel IBSA Quinto. are accused of having been in breach of licence conditions, between May 4 and June 28, 2004. having, according to the published charges, taken 33 tonnes of fish above their allowable catch limit of 300 tonnes.

The Spanish company Freiremar AS is also on the charge sheet, as owners of the IBSA Ounto. Mr. Ferguson was able to inform the court that he was acting on their behalf as well as that of Quark Ltd. At the original hearing on October 13, Freiremar SA had been unrepresented.

Sources in the Falkland Islands fishing community put the value of the alleged excess catch in the region of US\$ 200,000.

Quark Fishing Ltd is also charged, as owners of fishing vessel Jaqueline, with being in breach of regulations designed to minimise the incidental mortality of scabirds, on or about June 6. (J Fowler, MP)

Argentine/UK exercise

A JOINT Argentine and British search and rescue exercise held last week was essentially a civilian operation, a spokesperson from Mount Pleasant has confirmed.

Captain Ben Taylor, media spokesman for the British Forces, said the exercise - Millennium II was conducted in international waters in the South Atlantic, not in Falklands waters as reported by the Argentine press.

EVEN as I sit here safely behind my computer, already I can envisage a collective wince as readers see the front page coverage of the arrest of a man for assaulting a child.

When this story first broke back in September, I received a number of quiet protests from individuals who believed such material should be omitted from page 1. After all - anyone around the world can read it on the internet and just what sort of an impression of the Islands does such a

I can emphasise with this viewpoint however, more strongly. I believe the paper must honestly record and reflect the goings on in the Falklands.

I know some consider such articles unsavoury and would prefer to see these issues well and truly swept under the carpet. But it's important we don't hide from these difficult subjects.

One's natural reaction is to feel slightly ashamed and attempt to hide what is going on - but what sort of message does this give to the victims in such cases? The only way to stop cycles of abuse is to encourage people to talk openly and honestly - and that includes within the media.

Whether the defendant is found guilty or not is not for Penguin News to speculate. However, whatever the outcome of the case, it is imperative for us to report it. We can't hold front page-worthy material back solely because it could be considered unattractive.

Just think, if we stuck to that rule, the Argentine president would never make an appearance.

ON A happier note. I was pleased to hear that a new group from SAMA82 arrived in the Islands on Wednesday.

Many of us have witnessed first hand, during the pilgrimage and other lower key visits, the benefits for both veterans and Islanders of these excursions.

This was brought home to me by the return visit of the veteran we hosted in 2002, who made a surprise reappearance at my office two weeks ago. (My liver is yet to recover from his ensuing stay.)

In a moment of quiet contemplation he echoed the sentiments of many of his colleagues when he confided that to see the Falklands as they are today is the best healing he could ask for - it is proof that the job he did in 1982 was truly worthwhile.

I hope the newly arrived group can find a similar peace from their visit.

Land mine group to address Geneva Convention conference on Falklands

THE Governor has given details from the latest Joint Working Party (JWP) meeting, held in London last month to discuss the removal of land mines from the Falklands.

The October meeting was the JWP's first since 2001 when an exchange of notes was made between the United Kingdom and Argentine governments about the issue of demining

The latest meeting considered how the two governments should report to a conference due to take place in Nairobi, from November 29 - December 3, 2004. This conference is the first to review the progress of the Ottawa Convention which bans the use of land mines and makes provision for their removal where they have been laid.

His Excellency the Governor. Mr Howard Pearce, this week said, "The two governments are to report to this review conference on what action is to be taken to address the problem in the Falkland Islands." They will outline the progress made last month in progressig a feasibility study into the removal of the land mines

Mr Pearce said at last month's meeting, the UK and Argentine governments also agreed to appoint two project managers, " ..one on the UK side and one on the Argentine side for the process, and they also agreed some indication of what the costs of this should be.

"But over the next few months some work will need to be done to define the nature of the work which now needs to proceed."

The July 1999 Joint Statement

included a committment by the Argentine government to pay for this study Mr Pearce said motivation to tackle the problem of land mines in the Falklands seems equal on the part of both governments, however Argentina's economic problems in recent years have led to difficulties in making the money available, but hopefully now there will be progress with that."
He added, "The report to the

Ottawa Convention conference should focus everyone's minds...

The 2001 exchange of notes said that a feasibility study will be carried out regarding the clearance of land mines and the study will be carried out in three phases:

 A preliminary study which will asses the objectives, methodology, stages of implementation, timetable and resources required for the work

Ø A main study which will include execution of the work which the preliminary study identifies as

necessary, and

A final report to set out the conclusions that have been reached after the preliminary and main studies and which will make recommendations to both governments regarding future action.

His Excellency said that no indication has been made of the timescale involved in the study but he said, "...it is encouraging that there is going to be a further meet-ing of the JWP during the second quarter of next year and it will be the job of that meeting to decide on how to take the matter forward."

Desire survey indicates gas and oil

THE interpretation of both fasttrack and final-processed data from a 3D-seismic survey over Tranches C and D in the Falklands area has been completed, Desire Petroleum has announced, and the results are promising.

The company says a number of prospects have been identified and of these, "...at least six are large enough to contain economic accumulations of oil in the range 100-1000 million barrels."

In a statement released earlier this week, Desire Petroleum said the data interpretation included analyses of various seismic attributes as well as a geological study. "All of the processed data proved to be of excellent quality and the new interpretation largely confirms the new geological model proposed by the Company. In addition, other, new prospects have been identified associated, in particular, with well-defined alluvial deltas and fans."

According to Desire, one of the features of the 3D-seismic has been the presence of Direct Hydrocar-bon Indicators (DHI's), "...in particular, there are considerable indications of the presence of natural gas as well as oil.

"Considerable volumes of gas were encountered by the first well drilled by Shell in Tranche B but the well was not tested because, at that time, the value of the gas was too low to be economically producible in an area as remote from markets as the North Falkland Ba-

"However, since that time, the price of gas (along with oil) has risen sharply and new technology. such as gas-to-liquid (GLT) in which diesel fuel is produced from natural gas, have been developed. As a consequence, the Board commissioned a scoping study on the economics of gas production which has shown that, at prices well below current levels, gas accumulations would be economic given a field equivalent in size to a 300 million barrel oil field.

Desire said several of the prospects identified to date match this requirement. "It follows that natural gas can now be added to the economic prospectivity of the North Falkland Basin.'

The company said a number of parties interested in farming into Tranches C and D are now examining the interpretation, "...as well as conducting interpretations of their own.

Hopefully, these will lead to Desire Petroleum concluding a successful farm-out leading on to exploration drilling of the most attractive prospects.

'Pure practicalities' behind flights decision

THE stance adopted by the government's Air Service (FIGAS) in deciding to turn down potentially lucrative day trips is based on "pure practicalities", the airline's manager says.

Fraser Wallace was responding to last week's editorial in *Penguin News* in which Deputy Editor Sharon Marsh criticised FIGAS for turning down the profitable opportunity to transport cruise ship tourists to Sea Lion Island for day trips.

Mr Wallace says that due to logistical problems associated with day trips they have. "...in the main.

been discontinued

"On the few occasions that day trips have proceeded it has been on the basis that the day's flying programme would not be compromised and do not result in excess aircraft hours being flown whilst the aircraft is empty (a perennial dilemma).

"Those that have been achieved were confirmed at very late notice. The effect of this is of course to

increase income.

Mr Wallace agrees with Ms Marsh that. "...there is certainly the option to restrict the flying programme on pre-determined days to provide a day-trip service for cruise ship or other passengers." However Mr Wallace says the

However Mr Wallace says the value or otherwise of this option is.
The pretty much indeterminable: FIGAS provide a service to both the

civilian and military elements of the community, to a number of Government Departments with interests in the camp, and a considerable number of land based tourists.

The perceived rights and wrongs of denying these groups a service on selected days each summer will be

open to debate."

He continues, "... The stance adopted by FIGAS is based on pure practicalities. We need the option of being able to rearrange a day's flying programme at short notice, should it be required, and having at our disposal all serviceable aircraft and on-duty staff.

"To have a particular day dedicated to day excursions and subsequent strict adherence to a flying programme denies us that flexibility which is essential to the service we provide and demanded by passen-

ger

The PN editorial emphasised the issue of revenue versus service, with the former winning on points. Mr Wallace says. "In common with all government departments, FIGAS do not have that luxury. Both revenue and service are required; those tasked with this juggling act are unlikely to appreciate sweeping statements about lack of commercial motivation and possible development of complacency."

He adds that the suggestion that the government is losing a huge amount of revenue due to FIGAS not providing an excursion service may not - "curiously enough" - be necessarily correct. "Given particular sets of bookings, it is possible that a day's excursion will provide less revenue than would otherwise be achieved."

Mr Wallace suggests that the editorial took out of context a remark about complaints from the Chief Executive. He says, "...there have been complaints – both from residents and visitors – about being unable to travel because of the other."

Mr Wallace says however that the remark gave rise to the "such an attitude towards satisfying locals first" comment, which he describes as annoying, "...not only because it is incorrect and slightly Basil Fawltyish, but indicates that the point was missed – we have to look after all our customers; complaints indicate that we are failing."

The airline's manager says FIGAS is effectively one of several government services that subsidise community life. "It absorbs some of the cost of provision of leisure and business travel, freight, agriculture, medical, education and tourism services to name but a few."

He adds. "My colleagues and I have this uneasy feeling that if FIGAS could walk on water, some-body somewhere would darkly mutter 'FIGAS can't swim'"

Captain Taylor said the purpose of the exercise was to, "...practice the co-ordination and direction of international search and rescue procedures in the South Atlantic by the Regional Rescue Co-ordination Centre at Ushuaia and the sub-Centre at Mount Pleasant.

"Both of these centres have internationally recognised responsibilities under the International Mari-

time Organisation."

He said "maritime assets" from both Argentina and the Falkland Islands participated in the exercise including ships, aircraft and helicopters, and the result was judged to be

"very successful".

The media spokesman added that the UK and Argentina have conducted these joint exercises before, "...as part of our common commitment to fulfil our international Search and Rescue obligation and to practice our ability to work together effectively in the event of a disaster in the region."

Climb aboard Tara

A VISITING yacht, anchored today in Stanley harbour, is to leave the Islands tomorrow on a unique voyage.

Tara. formerly Antarctica, will tomorrow collect a group of deaf people and sail them to South Georgia where they will undertake to retrace the steps of explorer Sir Ernest Shackleton.

The expedition, called Mountains of Silence, is joined by former Vendee Globe racer Catherine Chabaud.

The journey falls under the United Nations' Education Programme.

Tara will be open to the public this evening and tomorrow morning and the crew have invited the Falklands community to come on board and take a look around. She is moored at the public jetty.

Veterans visit now on

TWO former Royal Marines have returned to the Falklands along with a former Welsh Guard and a Royal Artillery man hosted by the South Atlantic Medal Association.

Their visit coincides with Remembrance Day and Remembrance Sunday.

Also in the Islands is Ross Wileman, who is here to scatter the ashes of his grandfather, Les, who served on the RFA Fort Grange in 1982 and visited the Islands during the 2002 Pilgrimage. Mr Wileman requested in his will that his ashes be spread at San Carlos waters.

Crusher on the road today

A PIECE of machinery, which was too big fully assembled to be transported on a UK motorway, is being brought by road from Mare Harbour to Stanley today.

The impact crusher is around four and a half meters high and will be carried on the low loader trailer.

Highways engineer Bob Hancox says his only concerns are to do with the overhead cables and oncoming traffic. There will be a police escort assisting the move. (FIBS)

Chandlery's changing rooms Wylie - not Smiley - style

THE perfect calm of Wednesday morning was the exact conditions the General Manager of Seafish, Hamish Wylie had been hoping for to literally, lift the roof off the Chandlery

Designed by Hamish, he said this daring venture was the cheapest option to increase floor space in the shop, "...with no cost of roof or foundations, enabling the mostly logical extension to the building to give us what we want."

Brian Middleton was at the controls of Neil McKay's crane and Hamish commended him on an excellent job of getting the roof off and then, "... lined up and back on again," later in the day.

"All the panels were lifted on by crane, and we lifted in the plasterboard for both floors and the flooring for the first floor, ready to finish the interior at the earliest opportunity."

The offices will be finished in-house as time permits," adding, "Nev, Leyla and I have been working out of Neville's office which is rather cosy."

Can the mussel industry grow?

IS A large scale commercial mussel development a feasible option for the Falklands?

That's what Crick Carleton and John Holmyard from Nautilus Consultants in the UK are in the Islands to find out.

The pair are looking at the practical side of a much wider international appraisal of the creation of a Falkland Islands Mussel industry.

Nautilus Consultants was instructed by the Development Corporation (FIDC), at the request of the Mussel Development Group - Drew Irvine, Dick Sawle, Simon Hardcastle, Hamish Wylie, Stuart Wallace, Cheryl Roberts, Michael Harte, John Barton and Harry Hansen.

Hansen.
"I know that mussels grow very well here so I am looking for confirmation from Nautilus that large scale commercial development of mussels with a view to exporting from the Falklands is feasible," said Simon Hardeastle, the one member of the Mussel Development Group with practical aquaculture and mussel farming experience.

The wide-ranging study includes growing, testing and quality assurance, marketing, processing, 'knowhow' and financial appraisal.

Mr Carleton, Chief Executive of Nautilus commented, "For twentyfive years, Nautilus has been carrying out global work within the fisheries and aquaculture sector.

"Having worked on fisheries in both Tristan da Cunha and St Helena we have experienced some of the challenges of developing aquaculture and fisheries businesses in remote situations."

He said his initial impressions are that the Falkland Islands has, "...tremendous strengths given the nutrient rich water, lack of industrial development and purity of environment.

"However, this needs to be carefully weighed against the risks of early market entry, common lack of infrastructure and distance to markets. Capturing economies of scale will be critical to overcoming the many cost constraints that apply in the Falklands."

John Holmyard, a marine scientist and mussel farm owner is providing the technical appraisal.

He commented, "Having spent a day with Simon Hardcastle of Falklands Fresh, I've been very impressed with their operation and the development possibilities.

"Clearly, careful thought needs to be given to the type of systems and processing required to produce volume milestones of say 2000, 3000 or 5000 tonnes.

"Nonetheless, from what I've seen so far and I've been out in camp every day I've been here, things look good."

A detailed programme of field appraisals and meetings with companies and government departments has been put together, but anyone interested in finding out more should contact the visit organiser, Margaret Williams at FIDC.

Q IF the police are aware that someone has been drinking alcohol and is likely to drive, as apparently happened in a case which went to court on Wednesday last week, shouldn't they take preventative action and stop the person from getting in their car?

Couldn't the public be put at risk if the person is allowed to drive before being approached by police?

A Chief Police Officer, Superintendent Dave Morris responded, "If the Police Officer was there at the time, then yes they would take preventative action, but in the incident the letter is referring to this was not the case."

Q THERE appears to be a lot of UK coinage being used in the Falklands. Does this have any effect on our economy and, if too many are in circulation are they collected and returned to the UK?

A Financial Secretary, Mr Derek Howatt replied, "The effect on the economy of the use of UK coinage in the Islands is marginal. They are not collected and returned to the UK as it would be uneconomic to do so."

Q UNDER the Stanley Services Ltd monopoly, can an individual import fuel (petrol, diesel, kerosene, gas) for private/personal use?

A Our thanks to the Chief Executive, Mr Chris Simpkins, for the following response. "Any person who wishes to import any petroleum product must have a licence from FIG under the Petroleum Products Ordinance. Petrol, diesel, kerosene. butane and propane are all petroleum products and the Ordinance provides for an exclusive licence to be granted. Since 1987, Stanley Services Limited have had an exclusive licence to import petroleum products used as fuels. FIG is not able therefore to grant a licence to anybody but Stanley Services Limited to import those products

"Lubricating oils and fuels used by the military are not affected by the Stanley Services Limited monopoly.

Open verdict recorded in Rowlands inquest

AN OPEN verdict has been recorded on the death of former Financial Secretary, Mr Harold Rowlands, earlier this year.

An inquest was resumed on Tuesday having been opened and adjourned for further enquiries on April

Mr Rowlands' body was found on the beach to the east of B Slip on April 17, 2004.

As an overview to Mr Rowlands' last movements, HM Coroner Clare Faulds read seven statements from family and friends who had spent time with Mr Rowlands in the weeks leading up to his death and from a police officer who assisted in the search after he had been reported missing.

Mrs Faulds explained that a medical report by Professor Rutty showed that examination of various organs showed some changes indicative of minor illness but none that would have caused or contributed to death.

She said there was a head injury; a thin haematoma which also neither caused or contributed to death.

Professor Rutty said in his report that if there were alcohol present it would be difficult to determine as alcohol can be produced in the body during the post mortem period.

Mrs Faulds said she was of the opinion that the deceased had died as a result of drowning, however as she could not be certain of the events which led up to his death, she recorded an open verdict.

The inquest into the death of Mrs Cheryl Backhouse was also resumed on Tuesday. Mrs Backhouse died at King Edward VII Memorial Hospital, Stanley on March 19, 2004

Mrs Faulds ruled the cause of death was Streptococcal Septicaemia; the Coroner's conclusion as to the death was that she died of natural causes.

Inquests into the deaths of Miss Dionne Jones in February 2004 and Mrs Betty Miller earlier this month will resume today.

Sixth Formers survive after 'plane crash'

FIVE intrepid Sixth Form students and their teacher have had their survival skills put to the test with a challenge laid on by the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF).

Robert Butler, Sam Elliot. Jon Felton, Christine Hewitt and Evan Velasquez and their Community School (FlCS) teacher. Trish Halmshaw, spent a night at Long Island last week, living off the land and faring for themselves.

On Day One, the FIDF staff organised a series of lectures and practical sessions covering a wide range of topics including the steps to rescue, survival clothing, basic survival skills, animal and fish traps, living off the land - plants and wildlife - fire, water and shelter construction.

Ms Halmshaw said one of the highlights of the morning was the receipt of the survival tins, ordered especially for the course. Each tin included items such as a knife, whistle, matches, fishing line and hooks, fire starter, hand saw and water purification tablets.

Students were encouraged to 'tailor make' their tins by adding other useful items - notable additions included larger hooks, a cigarette lighter, boiled sweets and instant tea.

The final activity of the day was at the Canache. The group was given 30 minutes to collect as much driftwood, flotsam and jetsam as

possible. Everything collected would be used on Day Two for constructing the shelter and for the fire. The group's hard work resulted in a full trailer load of assorted wood, plastic and metal.

The group met on the morning of day two, each with the minimum of kit - what they were wearing, plus water bottle, spoon and survival tin. Everyone took a sleeping bag, in the hope that the FIDF

staff would take pity on the group if it was a really cold night

The adventure started with a cold, wet voyage around the harbour in the FIDF rigid raider. Ms Halmshaw said, "It was a drizzly, raw morning, but it didn't dampen the spirits of the group, especially when the raider sped across in front of FICS."

After a warming cuppa at the FIDF HQ, the group split up to be driven round to Long Island. But just as the buildings came in to view, the vehicles stopped unexpectedly and the group was told the final scenario had begun ...the group had survived a plane crash and needed to survive until help arrived.

The group walked the remaining six kilometres to the beach, and then scouted out a suitable site for the shelter. Ms Halmshaw said, "Everyone got involved in using all the available materials to construct a six-person shelter against a peat bank."

Food was in the form of a sheep, slaughtered by Sgt Paul Watson and

butchered by members of the group. A huge SOS signal was made on the beach whilst the fire was lit.

The remainder of the day was taken up in fetching and boiling water, making the shelter more comfortable and rainproof and preparing a mutton meal - barbecue, stew and kebabs, to show off different culinary skills.

The FIDF staff came to visit the group early on during the night and said they were impressed by the standard of the shelter.

Each group member was tasked with producing a wooden spoon by morning - a useful task which helped to make sure nobody dropped off to sleep during his or her two hour fire-watching rota during the night.

Ms Halmshaw said, "Each pair took at least one watch and managed to keep the fire going all night. Some of the group managed to sleep very well, if the snoring was anything to go by!"

After a breakfast of mutton kebabs, the shelter was dismantled and all the metal and plastic items were put on the trailer to be brought back to Stanley. The site was left in its natural state and the group set of to walk the six kilometres back to the drop off point. But the FIDF staff were feeling generous and the walk was cut short.

On return to the FIDF HQ. Major Biggs judged the wooden spoon competition, with Jon Felton coming out as winner. Gear was hosed down and the group had a de-briefing with the FIDF staff.

Ms Halmshaw commented, "All concerned felt that the three-day programme had been a great success. The group worked very well together and nobody fell out! The construction of the shelter had been sound and the group felt they could have survived until they were rescued - however long that was!

"A huge thank you to all the members of the FIDF who were involved in making the course such a success. Let's hope it becomes an annual event."

First planning meeting for new officers

MEMBERS of the Planning and Building Committee were greatly outnumbered by "members of the public" when a total of thirteen persons attended to witness the open part of the Committee's activities. However of those, eleven were present on a training course in minute-taking organised by Eileen Davies.

It was the first meeting to be attended by the recently arrived Environmental Planning Officer (EPO). Dominique Giudicelli, and Building Adviser John O'Gara. It was to be a relatively short meeting with only thirteen planning applications to be considered, another of those listed having been withdrawn by the applicant, and Part I lasted barely thirty minutes.

With several members absent all of whom gave apologies, including two overseas, only three were present: the Honourable Richard Cockwell who chaired the meeting and was supported by the Honourable Norma Edwards and Mike Harris

Previously deferred applications which were again deferred to await further information included the outline application submitted by Mr and Mrs Derek Cantlie for the erection of a dwelling on land at 5 Kent Road, and the sign proposed for display at Atlantic House on Philomel Street by Energise F.L. Limited.

Similarly deferred was the submission by the Falkland Islands Meat Company who wished to create a disposal site on the beach south of the Sand Bay Abattoir for "OVS and MHI inspected low health risk surplus abattoir waste". It was agreed that there was still insufficient information provided, but members were in agreement that due to time constraints it may be necessary to hold a special meeting when the further details were to hand.

Next on the agenda was just one application to renew a previously granted consent. The container at Lee Molkenbuhr's property at 19 Sulivan Street was given a further twelve month's extension but members agreed that, in accordance with their policy towards such structures, there would be no such further approval.

Moving on to the nine new applications seeking planning permission, the Committee first looked at plans for a pair of semi-detached one-and-a-half storey dwellings at 6 Gleadell Close submitted by Mr and Mrs Ian Doherty and Chris Hawksworth. Noting the recommendation to grant conditional approval including the need to provide not less than two off-street parking spaces for each property, members agreed to approve the submission.

Also approved, with conditions, were the following: the display of twenty-two signs, each 150mm by 150mm, by Bruce Wilks at various locations along Ross Road: the erection of a "Glasdon Hut" by Cable and Wireless on land at the corner of Goss and Biggs Roads with the finish to be to the satisfaction of the EPO: a new access onto Stanley Bypass from the south boundary of 53 Lookout Industrial Estate for Stanley Body Repairs; a mussel farm consisting of a single line of floating buoys and ropes on a site between Pleasant Island and the settlement at Fitzroy for Simon Hardcastle; the erection of a conservatory at 5A Ross Road West for Geoff Pring; and a garage at 38 Ross Road for Tony Smith.

Two applications sought permission in principle for development: South Atlantic Marine Services Limited applied for an extension to their existing jetty to create a marina with eight berths and here, whilst granting outline planning permission subject to the standard conditions, it was agreed to assess the possibility of difficulties with the existing sewage disposal pipe in the vicinity and any increase in traffic at the detailed stage of plans.

The Committee also granted permission in principle for an extension to the dwelling and the erection of a conservatory at 30 Ross Road East for Mr and Mrs R Biggs.

The Building Adviser then reported upon eight submissions seeking Building Permits, five of which were still the subject of deferment due to absence of sufficient information having been previously deferred at earlier meetings.

He was however, pleased to advise that Permits could be granted for work to enlarge the first floor flat at Lady Hunt House on John Street; Geoff Pring's conservatory at 5A Ross Road West; and Tony Smith's garage at 38 Ross Road.

There being no applications for off-street parking grants, the Chairman closed Part 1 of the meeting with the details of the next meeting which will be held on Thursday, December 2 at the Liberation Room and commencing at 9am.

October's weather

THE month showed a fair amount of variety - fine weather at the start with reasonable temperatures contrasted with cold weather at times in the second half - and a period of strong north west winds with rotor effects. common in the middle of the month.

High pressure and fine weather initially brought temperatures up to 16.4C on the 6th and the period to the 14th had generally above average temperatures.

The mean maximum for the month was 10.8C against the average of 10.6C. The lowest maximum was 3.9C on the 27th. The highest temperature was 17.0C on the 20th. The mean minimum was 2.9C against an average of 2.4C.

The lowest minimum was -0.9 on the 24th. There were two nights of air frost and 15 nights of ground frost

Rainfall was below average by about 5mm, at 29.9 mm. The highest daily total was 5.1 on the 22nd. There were 15 days of 0.1 mm or more and 10 days of 1.0 mm or more.

Snow fell on three days. There was a small amount lying on the morning of the 27th only.

Sunshine was slightly above average at 191.3 hours, against the 175 hours average. The sunniest day was 12.5 hours on the 12th.

Most of the strong winds and gales were in the first half of the month. There were four days of gales altogether.

The mean wind speed was 15.4 kts, the long term average being 16.0kts. The highest gust recorded was 58 kts on the 7th. Gusts exceeded 33 kts on 18 days, against an average of 18.

Generations gather for volunteers' 150th

A presentation was then given by WO2 Adam Cockwell and Sgt Paul Watson on the history of the FIDF and its diverse current-day role.

Promotions of members of the FIDF were then made by His Excellency the Governor. Mr Howard Pearce. Lieutenant Andy Brownlee was promoted to Captain. Colour Sergeant Justin McPhee was promoted to Lieutenant. Sergeant Paul Watson was promoted to Colour Sergeant and Lance Corporals Gerard Ford. Nigel Bishop, Owen Betts and Richard Morrison were all promoted to Corporal.

Addressing the gathering. His Excellency commented on the readiness of Falkland Islanders to stand to in their own defence. He referred to military campaigns in which Islanders had taken part, ranging from the Crimean War to the Falklands War.

He said. "That is a record of courage and commitment and bravery which I think Falkland Islanders can

Air Commodore Richard Lacey, then presented Long Service and Good Conduct Awards, in recognition of over twelve years' service to L1 Justin McPhee. "They are the most difficult 'enemy' that we have ever faced - they really give us a hard time."

Constitutional Review Progress and Activities to Date.

- 1. The Select Committee on the Constitution was set up by Legislative Council in April 2000, following the suggestion in the 1999 UK White Paper on the Overseas Territories that all OT's should examine their Constitutions, and constitutional relationships with the UK, to ensure that they suited all the current day circumstances. No time limit has been placed on the review, and it is considered that getting all the constituent parts right is the most important issue. At the same time as reviewing Constitutional issues, Councillors and the Civil Service have been looking at ways to streamline Government to provide a more cost effective service. Several of these issues interact with each other.
- 2. The Select Committee has met on a number of occasions as follows:
 - 31 May 2000 closed session to consider scope and procedure
 - 21 and 23 June 2000 closed sessions to meet lan Hendry Legal Advisor FCO
 - 4 December 2000 open session to receive written evidence from the public and presentations from the Attorney General, the Chief Executive and Arthur Donahoe, Secretary-General, CPA
 - 4/5 December 2000 closed sessions with Arthur Donahoe
 - 20 February 2001 closed session to consider a referendum on single constituency
 - 24 May 2001 closed session, further consideration of the referendum issue
 - 19 February 2002 open session to consider a number of issues, in particular a new Chapter on human rights and fundamental freedoms drafted by Henry Steele, advisor to the FCO.
 - 25 March 2002 open session to consider revised rules for the conduct of Legislative Council, and suggestions from the Chief Executive on the committee system/structure of Government
 - 16 May 2002 open session to further consider the structure of Government
 - 20 August 2002 closed session to consider the way forward on portfolio/committee issues
 - 28 January 2003 closed session on structure of Government, codifying the role of the
 - Speaker, and further consideration on compulsory purchase legislation
 - 24 March 2003 closed session on a composite Chapter One
 - 3 June 2003 Councillors workshop to develop ideas on revised structure of Government.
 - 8 January 2004 closed session to further consider issues raised by the workshop.
 - 18 February 2004 closed session to review progress to date and set a future timetable.
 - 26 October 2004 closed session to reach consensus on the structure of Exco and the
 - supporting committee structure.
- 3. The Select Committee was inactive through the latter part of 2001 until after the general Election in November 2001. The Select Committee remains hopeful that it will have a firm proposal to put to the public on Constitutional change within the next 3/4 months, but it is clear that changes are highly unlikely to have been implemented before the next General election in November 2005.

- 4. A number of issues have been considered and resolved throughout this period which arose out of discussions in the Select Committee but did not necessarily require constitutional change to proceed with them.
 - i. Single Constituency. A referendum was held co-incident with the 2001 General Election to gauge support for a single constituency and revised voting system. The majority of votes in both Stanley and camp were against the single constituency, and the matter was dropped. It has still to be concluded whether the matter of constituencies should be removed from the Constitution to the Electoral Ordinance to enable further consideration of the matter independently from constitutional change. Councillors favour this option provided that changes of constituencies can only be made following popular ballot.
 - ii. Legislative Council Standing Rules and Orders. These were reviewed and amended in a number of respects to enable and encourage greater debate in Legislative Council.
 - iii. **Speaker.** Legislative Council elected its first Speaker, and set out his duties and responsibilities. Councillors agree that there should be provision in the Constitution for a Deputy Speaker.
 - iv. **Principal Auditor.** The role, duties and responsibilities of the Principal Auditor, and his tenure of office, have been revised and clarified, as have the requirements to seek value for money from the outside audit. Some further discussion may be required to ensure that all provisions are now adequate but as cost effective as possible.
 - v. Management Code. A new modern management code for the Civil Service has been introduced after wide ranging consultations and discussions with staff. These replace General Orders, and have the effect of making Colonial regulations redundant in most respects. The issue of whether Civil Servants are employees or not, and how their rights are protected, remains to be finalised.
 - vi. Commander British Forces. It has been unanimously agreed by members of the Select Committee that the CBF should remain a member of both Legislative Council and Executive Council. The matter will not therefore be considered further.
- 5. There are a number of other issues that have been identified and largely agreed, but do require amendments to the Constitution to bring them into effect.
 - i. Revised Chapter 1. This chapter deals with the Fundamental Rights and Freedoms of people. It is intended that the right to self-determination be included in the body of the chapter, and a number of amendments made to bring us into line with the European Convention on Human Rights. None of these represent a major departure from current practice or the present Constitution.
 - ii. Citizenship Anomalies. Some revised wording has been drafted to deal with anomalies affecting children born abroad (generally for medical reasons) who would otherwise be Falklands citizens, but under current definition are not.
 - iii. Ombudsman. There is general agreement that there should be provision for an ombudsman, or complaints commissioner. It has yet to be agreed how such an office should be set up and resourced, but Councillors agree that provision should be made in the Constitution for this office, which should also act as the Human Rights Commission.
 - iv. Mentally III Patients. There is currently no provision for us to be able to send away mentally ill patients for treatment if they do not give their consent. This will need to be rectified in Chapter I.

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- v. Fixed Penalty Notices. Some changes to the wording of the Constitution are required to enable the introduction of fixed penalty notices (eg for parking infringements).
- vi. Internal Self-Government. There is a need to solidify, and in some cases codify, the extent of internal self-government, which underpins the right to self-determination. A clear description is required of the role of the Governor as head of the Public Service and the role of the Chief Executive as head of the Civil Service, and the separation between the two. Greater clarity is required of the circumstances in which the Governor may intervene in domestic affairs in the name of "good governance".
- vii. Appointments. The present Constitution says that the Governor acting in his discretion should appoint and dismiss Civil Servants (at all levels from Directors to part time workers), and be responsible for disciplinary control. Councillors do not believe that in this modern age there is any practical necessity for the Governor to be involved in appointments below Director level; these, and other personnel management issues in the Civil service should be the responsibility of the Chief Executive. This will require further discussion and codification, and possible revisions to the Constitution.
- viii. Public Accounts Committee. Councillors believe that there should be provision in the Constitution for a Public Accounts Committee (or other appropriate name), which would be an instrument of Exco or SFC, to investigate value for money or other issues put to it. It would not be a standing committee, but would be called together when required by one of those two bodies; its membership might change from one investigation to the next depending on skills required.
- 6. There have been lengthy discussions of a wide range of options for the future structure of Government with which all parties can be comfortable. A number of issues have been largely agreed which will form the background to a detailed proposal. These are:
 - we should be internally self governing to the maximum extent possible whilst delivering the highest standards of probity, law and order, good government and observance of Britain's international commitments, all as set out in the White Paper
 - Executive Council should continue to be the most senior Government body
 - we should continue to strive for greater openness in Government so far as is practicable
 - elected members should be accountable for the decisions and actions they take
 - to achieve such accountability members must take greater responsibility through development of portfolio responsibilities
 - however the Falkland Islands is not yet suited to full time Councillors and full ministerial responsibility is not therefore an option
 - there is a sufficient number of Councillors at present
 - however in order to fulfil the necessary workload all Councillors must be involved in the decision making processes as far as possible
 - nevertheless there must be sufficient scrutiny in the system, to critically examine decisions and their application
 - 7. Not all of these features would automatically lead one to the same conclusions. There are for example:
 - i. tensions between having all elected members fully involved in Government, and having scrutiny of the executive functions of Government that demonstrably works;
 - ii. tensions between Councillors taking more responsibility and being more accountable, but being part time;

iii. choices between having a restricted number on Executive Council as we do now, or having all members on Executive Council, and consequently having everyone involved in decision making, yet ensuring there is sufficient scrutiny of executive functions.

- 8. Areas where Councillors are now largely agreed are:
 - a. authority and decision making in government should be devolved to the lowest competent level, including from Executive Council to Management Committees
 - b. Exco would seek to confine its debate to strategic and policy issues, and where appropriate would act as an appellate body
 - c. all eight Elected Members of Council should be members of Executive Council
 - d. there should be eight Management Committees with limited executive power to carry out the strategies and policies approved by Exco
 - e. the chair of each of these Management Committees should be a Councillor, with two other elected members on each Management Committee. The Chair would be the advocate for that Committee and "critical friend" to the respective Head of Department.
 - f. these Committees should be the mechanism through which elected members portfolio responsibilities are exercised
 - g. there should be no lay members on Management Committees, since they have no standing in terms of responsibility and accountability for decisions. There would be as many officers on Management Committees as were strictly required to carry out it business; others could be invited to attend for particular items. Only elected members would have a vote.
 - h. Management Committees could have advisory panels for particular issues, largely made up of lay members, but with the right of attendance for the Chair.
 - minutes and/or reports of Management Committees would be submitted to Exco for review and explanation where required, with Exco having the right to amend decisions where necessary.
 - j. SFC should continue as a sub-committee of Legislative Council and be chaired by a Councillor.
 - k. Councillors will continue to meet in caucus as and when required, but there will be no move to formalise GPC or provide for it any particular role.
- 9. Councillors and officials will continue to work to devise a system that is efficient, makes best use of time available, is open and transparent, but which suits our particular circumstances. The Select Committee will meet again on Friday 26 November to confirm acceptance of the revised Chapter 1 and go through the Constitution clause by clause to pick up any outstanding issues.

During the exhibition's opening evening, Director of Falkland Islands Tourism, Mrs Connic Stevens, announced that Georgina had donated an image of a Rockhopper penguin as a prize in the competition.

On Monday, Mrs Stevens, said all but one of Georgina's images on display that were available for sale have sold. In addition orders had been received for additional copies of the sold images and a number of people have taken the order forms away with them and may be contacting Georgina directly in the near future to place an order.

Mrs Stevens said there has been



an "extremely positive" response to the images on display by both Georgina and Ian and numerous comments have been made, "...about how these images capture the amazing skies and light that are so typical of the Falkland Islands. The feedback has been very positive."

Mrs Stevens added that a number of recently arrived people in the Islands were "highly motivated" to travel around the Islands after seeing some of Georgina and Ian's evocative images.

Dealing with anger - points to ponder

MAINTAINING health and wellbeing requires attending to our emotional needs too. One emotion which is often cited as the culprit in many communication problems and relationship breakdowns both at home and within the workplace

Anger is a complex, confusing and powerful emotion. It is normal to feel angry when faced with a wide variety of life situations. Yet when anger leads to aggressive behaviour, mood swings or conflict within relationships it can be a problem for us and those around

Anger management involves learning to understand our reactions to situations that make us angry and learning to change our behaviour. Anger management is not about suppressing anger, it is learning to become not too angry so often and when we do become angry. keeping it at low levels of intensity and not letting it last too long.

What are the causes of prob-lematic anger?

 External Events or Situations Frustrations like when our expectations are not met. Annoyances and irritations like when others get on our nerves. Injustice or unfairness towards us or others like discrimination. Abuse, either physical or verbal like name calling, or indirect abuse like sarcasm and put downs.

Stress

People who feel wound up often present as angry not anxious. The physical symptoms of stress and anxiety are also present when we are angry.

Behaviour Patterns

Our previously learned patterns of behaviour will dictate how we deal with anger. Aggression, passivity, antagonism, withdrawal or avoidance are common examples of problematic behaviour patterns.

 Thoughts and Perceptions of events and situations

Our style of thinking when we are confronted with a situation that makes us angry has been learned over time. Examples of problematic thought patterns are focusing too much on our anger and giving anger too much of our time

Ten points to ponder





Events, people or things don't make us angry, it is our thoughts and reactions that create our anger. The idea that we are responsible for our own anger is to our advantage because it gives us the chance to regain control of our

Most of the time anger is not helpful. Anger can immobilise us and serve no productive purpose. Ask yourself, does anger make you or others miserable? If so, is there anything that you can do to correct the difficulty?

The interpretations we make that create anger are usually based on distorted thoughts, assumptions or misinterpretations. By correcting these misinterpretations you can reduce your anger.

4. If your anger is caused by the belief or assumption that someone is acting unfairly towards you or some event is unjust. Your anger will increase if you feel the injustice is intentional. Ask yourself why have I assumed that this act or event is intentionally unjust? What purpose does it serve?

5. If you learn to recognise the pattern of your angry reactions you can reduce your anger. Maybe you will realise other's actions are not unfair from their point of view! If you learn to challenge the notion that your concepts of justice and fairness are not shared by everyone, much of your frustration and resentment may vanish. Remember, many of our reactions are habit and can be changed.

Retaliation or getting back at someone will often cause further deterioration in a relationship, even if in the short-term it seems to fulfil you. No-one likes to be

the object of someone else's angry outbursts. Taking time out of a situation often allows our anger to deescalate which can in turn create a more constructive environment for better communication.

7. A great deal of anger involves our defence against loss of self-esteem, especially if others criticise, disagree with, or fail to act or behave as you expect them to. Blaming someone else for your feelings of worthlessness, will not improve your self-esteem. Tackle the problem, when required confront the situation constructively.


Unmet and unrealistic expectations produce frustration. So learning to readjust your expectations of yourself and others can reduce unhelpful angry feelings. For example. I or others, should not make mistakes', is an unhelpful expectation, 'mistakes happen' is more realistic.

9. You have the right to be angry, but the key issue is:- Is it to my advantage to feel angry?

Will I or others benefit from this

Sometimes we have to let go of anger. If we can't deal with the problem or confront the issue, try talking it through, expressing how you feel, or, try to spend the excess energy by going for a walk or a run. Releasing the tension can help deal with anger.

10. If we are in the habit of dwelling on angry thoughts this can prolong our anger. Learning to appraise our anger and discriminate between the important and the unimportant issues in our life which create anger can be a useful tool when dealing with anger.



Wool report - week ending November 6 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices in Australia and New Zealand were reported as, "generally unchanged" at auctions last week.

However when prices were converted into pence/kg clean basis, it could be seen that prices actually slipped by a few pence per kilogram clean for the very fine fleece wool lots and occillated around by a penny or two per kilogram clean for broader lots. The actual final result depended on specific demand for that particular micron.

In spite of continuing currency pressures, strong general buying interest was evident, with China once again particularly active.

In New Zealand last week there was an 83% clearance of the 5,041 bales on offer while in Australia 87% of the 49,262 bales presented to the trade were sold.

South American Community comes to light on December 9

THE South American Community of Nations has a founding date. December 9 in Ayacucho. Peru. according to the Mercosur Permanent Representatives Committee President Eduardo Duhalde

Speaking in Montevideo. former Argentine president Duhalde said that all South American presidents will be present at the signing of the fundamental charter of this new society of nations. following in the steps of the European Union. Ayacucho in Peru was chosen as the location for the ceremony because in this Andean city the last battle for the liberation of South American continent was fought in December 1824

Mr Duhalde added that the idea behind the South American Community is to advance towards the total integration of the 17 million square kilometres of the American continent, which would then become the world's leading trade and political block with a GDP equivalent to 800 billion US dollars and plenty of oil and gas for a hundred

"Maybe this is the most important event of our lives; individual countries simply can't make it on their own in a global world,

emphasized Mr Duhalde in Montevideo's Mercosur administrative Secretarial

Mr. Duahlde said that one of the first areas to integrate could very well be energy following on the EU steps,"...a regional grid that would ensure development for the whole continent.

However after signing the Charter in Peru, the instrumentation must be agreed by next March/April and only in two years time will Mercosur and the Community of Andean Nations officially become an only block

Regarding negotiations for a Mercosur-EU free trade agreement Mr Duhalde said they remain "stalled" waiting to their resumption next March.

Besides, asymmetries between the largest and smallest economies of Mercosur remain and seem difficult to overcome unless there's more "flexibility"

In an interview with the Brazilian daily O'Globo, outgoing EU Trade Commissar Paul Lamy admitted that before reaching a free trade agreement with the EU, Mercosur needs to finish building

"EU is offering a supplemen-

tary access to Mercosur's agriculture, in exchange for an increase in the number of consumers of EU goods, but the Mercosur domestic market is still under construction, remarked Mr Lamy.

The Mercosur market is slowly opening and we are in some ways helping it to build up," said the EU Trade Commissar adding that, "...my instinct tells me that the baby is not ready, we shouldn't force it.

However Mr Lamy praised the G 20 group of countries (which includes among others Brazil, South Africa, India, Egypt, etc), cause it has turned into one the axis of overseas economic relations for the EU.

A new Mercosur-EU meeting is scheduled in Lisbon next March 2005

According to political analysts in Montevideo and Brasilia the South American Community of Nations can be described as "Plan B.' if the EU-Mercosur fell through as effectively happened. Theoretically all South American countries will soon be sitting jointly at trade and political negotiations table with the EU and United States.

Lan fares go up

FROM this Wednesday Lan Chile's domestic fares will increase 7%, the second time in the last three months, reports La Prensa Austral in Punta Arenas.

As was the case in August when prices last rose, increasing fuel costs was the main reason cited for the

In a recent visit to Punta Arenas Lan Chile's Chief Executive Officer, Pedro Pablo Errazuriz, confirmed the 7% rise but he pointed out it was below the surge of international fuel prices.

According to the new rates, a return ticket to Santiago from Punta Arenas, economy class including boarding tax, will now cost 131,242 Chilean pesos (formerly 121,178); the second rate - an open ticket will cost 187,242 Chilean pesos (177, 178).

Punta Arenas/Puerto Montt return ticket 110,242 (103,178) Chilean pesos.

Punta Arenas/Temuco return ticket 134,584 (133,584) Chilean pesos.

This week the US dollar was selling below 600 Chilean pesos in Santiago.

Smoking ban: health councillors disagree

COUNCILLOR Cheek would like to see a "total ban" on smoking in confined public areas but her colleague Councillor Birmingham disagrees.

The British Government this week announced that smoking will be banned in the majority of enclosed public places in England within four years.

Penguin News contacted the two councillors with responsibility for Health and asked if the Falklands should follow suit.

Councillor Cheek said, "Considerable thought has already been given to this subject because the numbers of people suffering from smoking related illnesses is a serious concern

'Many private businesses operate 'no smoking' policies and more are providing non smoking areas. Some plan to go non smoking in the near future

"I would like to see a total ban in any confined public areas because non smokers should not be subjected to other people's smoke.

Also a member of the Health and Medical Services Committee, Councillor John Birmingham believes there is no need for a ban: "As a former smoker I have sympathy with people who are trying to give up smoking but I think there is a sector of the population who enjoy having a cigarette and they also have

their rights.
"I would prefer to leave it up to the individual publican and restaurant owner to make a decision as to whether to ban smoking on their premises at this time."

In his Health of the Nation report, prepared in 2000, Chief Medical Officer, Dr Roger Diggle, indicated. ...smoking related diseases ... are the major causes of ill health and premature death in the islands

Smoking in Government buildings was banned after Executive Council approved recommendations by the Health of the Nation smoking working group's report.

Councillor Cheek referred to reports on the recently introduced ban in Ireland, "...which seemed to indicate that it was approved of by many smokers as well as the non smokers

"It also appears that the trade was not badly affected.'

All three swimmers say they have no medal expectations but hope to beat their personal bests in a variety of races.

Swim team coach Pam Freer said the three will have training sessions in Melbourne in the week before the Bendigo Games and, once they have finished competing, they will immediately start training in Australia for the 2005 Island Games in Shetland.

Mrs Freer paid tribute to the trio's dedication. She commented, 'They're all tired but it's worth it; they're proud to be representing their country and to be seen on the international stage.

She said, "They may not be in the running for medals but they certainly won't shame themselves."

All three are GCSE students and have also been involved with the Falklands Suite, a musical project heavily involving Community School students.

Mrs Freer said, "They've all been so busy with the Falklands Suite and their music lessons; they've done really well to fit so much training in."

She said she was grateful to the many Falklands companies who have provided the vital sponsorship which allows the team to attend the Games.

Athlete Roxane Morrison is representing the Islands in the 400m track event.

The seventeen year old is currently studying at Chichester College in the United Kingdom and will travel on her own to Australia to meet up with the rest of the team.

She has been training for the Games since her arrival at college last year where she runs regularly with the college cross country team; more recently she has been training three or four times a week under the guidance of one of the school cross country coaches.

Roxane said she is "really nervous" about the Games but added, ..I'm aiming to do my best.'

More pressingly, she has a charity parachute jump to make tomorrow, before she sets off for Australia on Tuesday.

News in brief

Fiery double act

MEMBERS of the Fire and Rescue Service were wide awake early yesterday morning when they were called out to deal with two separate fires.

At approximately 3.30am they were called to Fitzroy Road where a car was on fire. The vehicle was completely burned out.

The Chief Fire Officer, Mr Gardner Fiddes, said the fire was most likely caused by faulty wiring.

As the firefighters were dealing with the car, a second call came in at around 4.00am, reporting a fire in Colin Smith's workshop at Lookout Industrial Estate.

The blaze was brought under control, but substantial damage was sustained to both the exterior and interior of the building and the ceiling collapsed while the fire was be-

Mr Fiddes said the cause of the fire was a jammed electrical wire.

Delayed mail on its way

THE Postmaster is hopeful that airmail which has been delayed in the United Kingdom will arrive in the Falklands today.

Mrs Moira Eccles said the delay appears to have been caused by a "communications error" and, "...our mail was looping with the Royal Mail's system, going out of one depot to another then back to the original.

She said she has raised the problem with the Royal Mail and, "...they've said it will be fixed."

A significant backlog of airmail was received on Monday and Mrs Eccles says it is anticipated that a similar volume will arrive today.

She said, "We shall endeavour to have mail available for collection from 9.30am on Saturday, November 20."

Penguin News A Could our fishing future lie in krill?

IDO hope readers will indulge my blatant pilfering of a UK news story for use in the Falklands - the 'to ban or not to ban' question surrounding smoking in enclosed public places.

Ireland and New York have done it, New Zealand and England are set to follow and Sydney. Australia looks like going even further with a complete ban on smoking anywhere considered public - including on pavements and in open air cafes.

The incidence of smoking in the Falklands is as high, if not higher, than the rest of the Western world and, there's no getting away from it, it's not good for the nation's health. But, quite oddly, our society seems quite happy to just grin and bear it.

It's generally accepted that if you go out for a drink you will come away smelling like an astray - whether you smoke or not. You've just got to put up with it. The general feeling seems to be, if you can't stand the fug, don't go to the pub.

That's not a very forward thinking view and we need to look at alternatives. An all-out ban on smoking in pubs and restaurants may be a little bit of overkill for now - and I doubt many publicans would support it. But maybe there is something they can do

I can't help feeling it's about time licensees put some of their profits back into improving their customers' eating and drinking experience perhaps through the installation of improved extraction systems to provide cleaner air for their staff and customers?

I know some of the newer establishments have already made this responsible move - so maybe it's time the rest followed suit.

That way smokers can carry on puffing but not everyone in the room has to smoke by default. A happy medium, if you will.

SERIOUS discussion about introducing a smoking ban in the Falklands is probably a long way off, but it doesn't hurt to at least bandy the idea around. And who knows, it might even become an election issue in October next year.

the right direction for future Falklands industry?

Lars Aglen (right), a Norwegian engineer, is in the Islands this week to encourage fishing companies to look at krill fishing and processing as a way forward.

Mr Aglen's company, Gullvika AS, has produced an ingenious method for processing krill and he says the Falklands could profit substantially

Traditionally, krill has been fished then frozen for use as an additive in fish farming fodder. However Mr Aglen's company has produced a way of separating the meat from the shell. making it more desirable to the international market.

He explained that the method utilises enzymes to split the meat from the shell. The shell contains fluorine and is a limitation for the use of krill and Mr Aglen said, to produce a meatonly product is more desirable to the international market.

After hydrolysing, the krill also has most of the water removed from the meat, reducing the product to approximately quarter its original weight. To Mr Aglen this is a good thing: "...all the value is there. - in fact it increased because the shell is gone. Your ships can carry four times the amount of product.

A by-product of the process is colour which is utilised in the salmon farming industry - "... it is desirable now to use natural rather than artificial colour.

Mr Aglen said he is in the Falklands first of all to learn about fishing in the South Atlantic, "...and to see if there is a chance that the Falkland Islanders are interested in start-

ing up such a krill fishery "Also, I wanted to meet the authorities to hear their view on this."

He said the response has been encouraging. "We had already mailed a few of the companies and the response has been good.

When asked what sort of scenario he envisaged of a krill fishery in the Falklands, Mr Aglen said, "Our interest is to deliver the processing lines; in order to do that, because this is a completely new thing, we needed to arrange end buyers of the product and the financing - which we have done - and it's really only the catching left now."

Mr Aglen said he is not in the Falklands to get involved with the buying or selling of krill: "I want to see if Falklands companies are interested in catching krill for themselves



not me - to sell ...

"I make the processing equipment which they would have on their ships. But I have to go to both the market and the catching side to create a chain - otherwise this will never take off."

Mr Aglen has brought samples of the final product with him to show companies - "they are now taking a look at this."

Mr Aglen is clear that substantial investment will be needed by companies involved in krill fishing: "You would have to either lengthen an existing fishing boat or build a new one."

But he adds, "The big question is, are they hungry enough?

Mr Aglen said there is no reason why the processing procedures may not be carried out at sea: "...as they do today, you hardly ever see a fish-

ing vessel in this harbour.
"They can fish, process and load into a tanker to take to Europe, without Falklanders seeing anything, ex-

cept the money." However he adds, "The other option is that you fish with a local boat, process it on board and take the concetrate back to the Falklands; you dry it here then send the meal to

Europe.
"You would need a storage capacity in silos for the finished product. "To me this option is the correct

one for the Falkland Islands" Mr Aglen said he feels the fishery could be entirely Falklands owned and operated, "...with a local ship, entirely owned by the locals, not over-

According to Mr Aglen, krill resources are such that they would support a sustainable fishery. "Nobody really knows how much krill there is...but the resource seems endless, even the lowest estimates show this."

No charges for 'recall' eye appointments

PATIENTS who have been recalled to see the optician this month will not have to pay for their extra appointments.

Responding to a query from Penguin News, Director of Health Norman McGregor Edwards said the optician's recalling people outside their normal appointment cycle was "un-expected" and raised an "important point of principle."

Patients were initially told they would have to pay a £20 consultation charge for the extra appointment, however Mr McGregor

Edwards says this is no longer the case: "Following discussions at the Health and Medical Services Committee we will not be charging people for optician-generated recall appointments, although we are probably one of the few nations in the developed world not to charge for these.

Alcohol plays part in domestic incident

A STANLEY man appeared in court on Wednesday on two charges of criminal damage and one of assault.

Crown Prosecution Ros Cheek told the court that the defendant, Robert William Stewart (42) had a history of problems with alcohol.

She said that on November 3 Mr Stewart struck his partner and broke a window and a door of a government building.

On November 16 Mr Stewart's partner made a withdrawal of her statement of her own accord, however it was considered to be in the public's interest to continue with the

case

Hugh Ferguson in defence said that individually the charges were, "minor, compulsive actions," Mr Stewart did not mean to break the door and no one was present when the window was broken. He said the assault was one blow, "a open handed slap," and no injury was sustained.

Mr Ferguson said his client was an alcoholic, who had in the last two to three months been under a great deal of stress; he urged the Senior Magistrate to take into account Mr Stewart's background in deciding upon a sentence.

Mrs Faulds said a snap decision was not appropriate and she was willing to adjourn for the preparation of presentence reports; she told Mr Stewart he must behave impeccably in the interim.

Mr Stewart is to reappear in court on December 9 and was released on bail, under condition that he refrain from consuming alcohol and stay away from pubs.

Also in court on Wednesday was a man from Mount Pleasant who was banned from driving after he was involved in a 'morning after' single vehicle road traffic accident near

Bluff Cove. Crown Prosecution Ros Cheek told the court that Brian Lee Wright had been driving back to Mount Pleasant with three passengers on the morning of November 14 when a sheep ran out onto the road causing him to swerve; the vehicle con-

sequently rolled. When breathalysed by police, he gave a lower reading of 82mg per 100ml of breath analysed (35mg is the legal limit). Mr Wright had been drinking in the Globe Tavern until lam the previous evening.

Mr Wright received an 18 month disqualification from driving and was fined £600 plus £70 prosecution

Sheep skin specialist's visit approved

THE Falkland Islands Development Board (FIDB) has approved funds for a visit from sheep skin specialist.

The board heard a suggestion from General Manager Julian Morris that in a depressed market for skins it could be beneficial to have Mr Gavin Jacobs, who he had met on his recent visit to Chile, come to the Islands to have a look at the situation

Four and a half thousand pounds were approved for the visit with the general consensus being that it was an amount that could easily be recouped if skin processing were to be increased. Last season Sand Bay abattoir achieved a price of \$7.24 per skin with input from Chilean company Simunovich, however this year the same company is having difficulty in selling sheepskins at \$7

Regarding other abattoir matters, Mr Morris said he was "confident" that the blast freezer would be up and running for the forthcoming export season, however the cost of installation is still something to be settled. The new system is three to four times more powerful than the previous and the suppliers are confident that it will freeze the output from the abattoir in 48 hours.

The number of sheep to be slaughtered at the abattoir this season is not expected to increase overall on last season.

On the subject of finished lambs Mr Morris said they expected to have more animals through the abattoir this year.

He said they are prepared to be flexible depending on what peo-

Q CAN someone be breathalysed and prosecuted if, after a few drinks at home, they go outside to their parked vehicle to collect something?

Does this recent judgement (Alexander case) extend to any drunken person in possession of vehicle keys regardless of where they are or where the vehicle is?

Chief Police Officer, Superintendant Dave Morris, provided the following responses.
Under section 21(1) (b) of the

Road Traffic Ordinance 1948 a person who is in charge of a motor vehicle on a road or other public place commits an offence if he has consumed so much alcohol that the proportion in their breath exceeds the prescribed limit.

The limit is 35 microgrammes of alcohol in 100 millilitres of

breath.

It is a defence to prove that at the time the offence was committed the circumstances were such that there was no likelihood of driving whilst the proportion of alcohol in breath was likely to exceed the prescribed limit.

There is no statutory definition of being "in charge" and no hard and fast test. However, the Notes to the Ordinance make it clear that a close connection is envisaged between the Defendant and the con-

trol of the vehicle.

If the Defendant is the owner or lawful possessor of the vehicle, or has recently driven it then on the face of it he is in charge, unless he has put someone else in charge. If someone else is sitting in the vehicle or is otherwise involved with it the question is whether that person assumed charge

Relevant circumstances are:

Whether the Defendant is in the vehicle, where, and, if not, how far he is from it:

What he is doing;

- Whether he is in possession of the key that fits the ignition:
- Whether there is evidence of an intention to take control by driving or otherwise:
- Whether any other person is in or near the vehicle, and if so the circumstances.

It will be for the Court to consider all these factors and any others that may be relevant in reaching its decision.

How do drink driving regulations apply to someone riding a bicycle? Is there a legally prescribed limit for bicycles?

Under section 39 (3) of the Road Traffic Ordinance a person commits an offence who rides a bicycle on a road or other public place when unfit to drive through drink i.e. under the influence of drink to such an extent that they are incapable of having proper control over it.

How can an offence commit-

ted on a bicycle lead to an endorsement on a driving licence when you do not need a driving licence to ride a bike anyway?

An offence under section 39 (3) will not lead to a driving licence being endorsed as there is no requirement to hold a licence to ride a bicycle.

Within the definition of the Highway Code and as a road user, can a drunken person crossing the road also be prosecuted and get their licence endorsed?

Under section 79 (1) of the Licensing Ordinance 1994 a person commits an offence who, while drunk and in a public place, is disorderly in their behaviour or found incapable

An offence under section 79 (1) cannot lead to a driving licence being endorsed, even if the offence was committed whilst on a public road.

Q Having read, with interest, the supplement in Penguin News (November 12) entitled "Constitutional Review Progress and Activities to Date" and assuming "closed session" to mean exclusion of the general public; why were so many meetings "closed"? Surely those meetings could not contain anything of a personal nature?

A Councillor Mike Summers provided the following response

Reasons for a meeting to be closed can extend well beyond containing issues of a personal nature.

In the case of the Select Committee on the Constitution a number of the meetings were simply working group meetings to examine particular subjects - in much the same way that various parties will meet in advance of other formal Committee meetings to prepare material for consideration.

The important issue is that in advance of any proposals being finalised for submission to the FCO (Foreign and Commonwealth Office) there should be further formal consultation with the public, to ensure that there is full knowledge and understanding of what is being proposed, and no major objection to it.

If there is major objection it will be necessary to either reconsider the proposals, or if suitable revised proposals cannot be agreed, forward the objections to the FCO together with the proposals.

The PN supplement and the recent interview on FIBS is the beginning of the information and consultation process which is also to include further discussion on FIBS and some public meetings - or indeed any other discussion/interaction meetings proposed by members of the public.

Deciphering the history of Staats

MY COLLEAGUES and I have been conducting research on Staats Island in the West Falklands since

This December will be our fourth research expedition there, during which we will be investigating population, behavioural and genetic ecology of the unusual island population of guanacos found there. Some of our early findings will be published next year in the Journal of Biogeography in an article entitled "The Enigma Of Guanacos In The Falkland Islands: The Legacy Of John Hamilton"

We are also interested in understanding the history of the island. Over the years visitors have frequently left an intriguing historical record of sojourn by writing their names, dates and short inscriptions on the walls of Waldron's Shanty located on Hamilton Bay at the north end of the island.

Many wall writings we have been able to figure out, others not.

What follows below is a list of those inscriptions which we are sceking more information. If you recognise your name, a relative or that of an acquaintance, we would appreciate hearing from you to learn more about your visit to Staats, what you saw, learned and remember most.

Forbes urges FIG to end 'battle'

I WAS interested to note the article in Penguin News of November 12, 2004 in respect to the latest failure by the Government to deprive my company of their just rights under the terms of the ESD Contract.

I was also particularly interested to note that it is considered that the Government's actions throughout this arbitration are considered a "battle" against my company, whereas I have only ever wanted a "fair rec-ompense" for the works executed on the ESD Contract. As this is the third appeal lodged by the Government, which they have described previously as being sought on good professional advice, then the results on each occasion have been totally in my company's favour clearly showing that the original arbitrator's part award of November 2002, by a man of complete impartiality, was completely correct by the fact that a further four judges have upheld the original decision.

Whilst the Government may consider such action as a "battle" I can only reiterate that in my opinion it is a further example of continued persecution of both myself

and my company.

This is not the first time that the Government has adopted this policy by the fact that my company had to go to arbitration on the West V Roads Contract whereby a settlement of approximately £230k was eventually made by the Government. There also remains a further matter currently in the Supreme Court where it is again shown that the Govemment have underpaid my company for the works executed on the 10 Houses Contract. Taking these three examples, which are the last three Contracts executed by my company for the Government, it can only be concluded that the actions have been predetermined.

Despite the fact that we have offered to make an overall settlement, including that of the 10 Houses Contract, the Government have rejected all opportunities to conclude all such matters by their actions of the appeals to date to the courts.

I am sure that the people of the Falklands are unaware of the overall costs and expenses which their Govemment have incurred to date, which I can only surmise is now in excess of the original claim of £3m despite the fact that in January 2003 our claims had been reduced to approximately £1.7m. It was against this sum that the arbitrator based his Final Award and as a result of the costs incurred to date exceeding this revised value, the Government's intention of minimising payment to my company has backfired.

I consider that it was hoped that the company would be unable to fund the extensive costs incurred to date and would have to give up all claims as a result of the costs incurred in defending the company's position but their "gamble" has not suc-ceeded. Whilst the revised claim was for approximately £1.7m, the Government's liability is far in excess of this sum as a result of the Arbitrator's Award, Interest (which is increasing on a daily basis) and the costs awards issued to date by the arbitrator and the Courts.

I am sure that whilst the Government is currently in the course of attempting to bring new oil exploration companies into the Falklands, the recent publicity in respect to this arbitration would make them wary to be involved with the Government who is seen by such publicity to be deliberately penalising a major contractor despite the fact that it has been advised by three independent forums that it has underpaid my company for works carried out in good faith for the Falkland Island people.

It is my consideration that the

time has come for the Government to end its "battle" and accept the awards by the arbitrator and the Courts and conclude this long running saga.



THE Falkland Islands has paid tribute to those who sacrificed their lives in conflicts both past and present, with its annual Remembrance Sunday commemorations.

The November 14 events beoan with a Service of Remembrance in Christ Church Cathe-

A large crowd gathered for the service, bolstered by visitors from aboard MS Explorer.

Councillor Stephen Luxton read the Roll of Honour, which names all Falkland Islanders killed in the two World Wars, and a reading was given by His Excellency the Governor.

Reverend Paul Sweeting delivered a sermon on the Unknown Soldier: "He lays there still, our Unknown Soldier - like thousands lying still in the fields of Flanders or the Jungles of Burma, or beneath the water of the Pa-

"He lays there still like those who fell here in 1982, laying beneath the waters of the South

Atlantic, laying in the arms of San Carlos, laying in the soil of the Falklands. And all, without exception, are known only to God."

The Cathedral service was followed by an Act of Remembrance at the Cross of Sacrifice, which again drew a large audience.

Troops from the Army, Royal Navy, Royal Air Force and Falkland Islands Defence Force assembled at the Cross. Following the arrival of the Commander of British Forces, Air Commodore Richard Lacey, and His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce, the service began.

Prayers were said by Reverend Sweeting, Reverend Paul Owens, and Mr Ken Newton before the Roll of Honour was read again, this time by the Chief Executive, Mr Chris Simpkins.

His Excellency the Governor read Laurence Binyon's words: "They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old. Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun, and in the morning we

will remember them."
The Last Post was played by
Mr Paul Freer before the Victory Green saluting guns marked the beginning and end of the two minute silence.

Reveille was played then a wreath laying ceremony was led by the Governor, with wreaths placed on the Cross by representatives of a number of organisations, including the British Forces, South Atlantic Medal Association, Royal British Legion and Red Cross.

The Royal Salute was given by the parading troops, then His Excellency descended the steps from the Cross.

Rounding off the morning's events, personal acts of remembrance were held at Memorial Wood. Although not an aspect of the actual parade, this now traditional part of the day allows those who wish to pay their respects in the small wood that has been established in memory of British Forces who lost their lives in the Falkland Islands.

Trouble free guidelines for baby's holiday

WHEN you are travelling, carry essential items in a large shoulder bag.
If you won't be able to warm food

en route, try and get your baby used to eating unwarmed food straight from the container a day or so before you go.

Cans are less bulky than jars and are unbreakable, but do not keep any unused food once the container has been opened.

If breast-feeding stick to your

usual routine

If bottle feeding, take prepared feed in an insulated 'cool' bag, a thermos flask of hot water and a small container in which to warm feeds.

Keep to your child's normal routine of eating and sleeping wherever possible.

If your child is prone to travel sickness, talk to your doctor or pharmacist before you go.

For older children take a bag containing toys, pens, paper, books etc to keep them occupied.

Travelling by car and coach.

Check how often the coach stops and for how long and plan your trip accordingly.

If you have a long journey, it's a good idea to travel at night.

Allow extra time for stops so that children can stretch their legs and use the potty.

Cassette tapes can be a great success- even if they're not to your taste, they're less tedious than bored children.

Always be aware of safety in the car. Seat belts are compulsory in Britain and many European countries.

Carry-cots should be strapped into position and toddlers should sit in special car seats.

Small children should never sit



in the front seat.

Trains

Take expressed milk with you if you do not want to breast-feed on

Consider reserving seats near the restaurant car, if there is one, since bottles or baby food can be heated

for you.

Travelling midweek means more space and can be cheaper.

Travelling by aeroplane Check the airlines facilities, such as sky cots, before you book and make sure the airline knows you are travelling with a baby or small child.

The stewardess can find you some privacy if you want to breast-

Take some extra food with you for your child.

Take one piece of hand luggage containing all essentials.

Give your child a drink or something to chew during takeoff and landing.

Travelling by ship

A night crossing on a channel ferry may be easier than daytime if you book a cabin.

If going on a long boat trip find out what facilities are offered for babies and small children and let them know when booking if you need a high chair, cot or any other equipment.

Take your own folding pram or buggy with a sun canopy.

Reins are a must for an adven-

turous toddler.

Don't rely on fresh milk at seatake a supply of baby's milk.

Going abroad

Passports: Even a baby needs his own passport or to be entered on that of one of his parents. Apply at least six weeks in advance to be safe. Make sure your children's routine vaccinations are up-to-date, and any others you may require. Your GP will advise you. Also make sure you have all the necessary insurance cover for your trip abroad.

When you are abroad:

do not use local milk; take your own baby milk.

make sure all water is boiled take baby foods with you, it is not always possible to buy baby foods

abroad don't let children stay in the

sun without covering them and always use high factor suncreams

make sure your baby has extra

take along a few familiar toys do attach identification labels to small children in crowded places

❖do remember fresh air often relieves travel sickness

*do carry a first aid kit (kept away from small fingers)

First Aid kit

Antiseptic cream or lotion, Calamine lotion, cotton wool, skin plasters, insect repellent, antihistamine cream for stings or bites, paracetamol preparation (especially for children) and travel sickness medicine.

Wool report - week ending November 13 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices in South Africa, Australia and New Zealand were reported as "strong to firm" at sales last week. As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" prices were up by between 2 and 6 pence per kilogram clean across the entire micron spectrum.

Prices for fleece types of relevance to Falkland Island farmers were particularly strong

A broad range of buying interest was evident, with a number of historically important processors of Falkland Island wool very active in the worlds markets. As an example "Modiano Wool" purchased almost 50% of the entire South African offering last week!

In New Zealand last week there was a 92% clearance of the 6,498 bales on offer while in South Africa 96% of the 9,624 bales presented to the trade were sold.

New airline begins flights to Punta

CHILEAN Civil Aviation Council unanimously decided on Wednesday to authorise Aerolineas del Sur (Aerolíneas Austral Chile S.A.) to operate in the Chilean domestic and international air markets as a Chilean company.

Aerolineas del Sur with a fleet of four Boeing 737/200 and a Jumbo 747 joins the two other outstanding air carriers operating in the country, Lan Chile and Sky Airlines.
Congressman Zarko Luksic, who

has insistently pushed for more com-petition in the Chilean domestic air passenger and cargo markets said Aerolineas del Sur plans to begin operations on December 6.

"The company's General Manager, Gustavo Mans, has informed us that the first flights will be non stop Santiago/Punta Arenas, twice a day and with cheaper fares than those from the dominant (Lan Chile) company," indicated Mr Luksic.

On granting the authorisation the Chilean Civil Aviation Council argued that the "real and effective" seat of Aerolineas del Sur is Chile which, besides the fact that the company was founded in Chile, share holding associates are also Chilean, a majority of its staff is Chilean, all aircrafts are registered in Chile and flights begin and end in Chile.

Following the decision Public Works, Telecommunications and Transport minister Javier Etcheberry said that the incorporation of Aerolíneas del Sur not only complies with all legal requirements but is part of Chile's "open skies" policy which the Chilean government is promoting in the region, ...so Chilean air carriers can have similar opportunities"

Bernardo Dominguez, chair of the Civil Aviation Council pointed out that "... the agency has worked and will continue to work with the purpose of achieving commercial air transport integration, particularly with neighbouring countries. South American skies can easily become an only market boosting the industry and our airlines'

Aerolíneas del Sur, (Aerolíneas Austral Chile S.A.) actually belongs to the Spanish tourism group Marsans which has a majority share in Aerolíneas Argentinas.

Congressman Luksic finally stated that "...this decision plus the beginning of Sky Airlines flights next December 15 puts an end to Lan's monopoly particularly to places such as Punta Arenas; Lan controls 80% of all domestic passenger traffic and almost 100% of cargo traffic".

The small town's main disco La Porteña just a few blocks from the main square was also visited by

Queen's Elizabeth's grandson on Saturday night.

According to the local newspaper El Ciudadano Prince Harry is very polite, attempted some words in Spanish during his shopping and has not been followed by the locals or harassed by the Argentine press,

"The town is not after Harry. There's some curiosity plus the fact that his custody includes several vehicles and bodyguards, but they don't run after him," said Marcelo Peleari from the local weekly La Palabra.

El Remanso is in the heartland of Argentina's polo country, where some of the best horses and players come from.

Prince Harry is scheduled back in Britain at the end of December to spend Christmas with the family and will then be starting Sandhurst military academy.

Meet Argentina head on'

challenges from Argentina "head on", visiting British Members of Parliament have said.

On the eve of their departure from the Falklands, after a week long visit, Labour MPs Dari Taylor, Vera Baird and Alan Campbell and Conservative Welsh Assembly member Alun Cairns encouraged Falkland Islanders to "keep talking" to Argentina about mutually beneficial top-

At a press conference held on Wednesday afternoon the four spoke of their visit in glowing terms, paying particular tribute to the Islands' 'magnificent' wildlife and the 'warm' hospitality of Islanders.

However all four had strong words to say regarding Argentina.

Alan Campbell commented on "lack of trust" with Argentina: If you're not under a situation of military siege, then there's certainly a feeling of being under one of economic siege

"It is for the Argentinians to try and build on that trust; unfortunately it seems subject to the hopefully short but very unreasonable attitude of the Argentine government at

present.

He recommended, "...parking those issues which are not open to negotiation, such as sovereignty, while keeping the door open on those issues that will be of mutual importance, like environmental matters and issues around tourism and fish-

Dari Taylor said that before departing the UK, she and her colleagues spoke to Foreign Office Minister Bill Rammel about Argentina's ban on charter flights to the Falk-

lands. She said Argentina's actions were, "...damaging international relationships

There is no relationship that is specifically Argentinian/Falklands: we are now an international global community and that interdependence is going to be more the case. not less the case.

She confirmed that the Foreign and Commonwealth Office will contime to work towards the reinstatement of the flights commenting, There is a serious determination (from Argentina) to undermine your economic development and that challenge has to be met head on.

But Alun Cairns said Argentina's rejection of the existence of the Falkland Islands Government makes

it "impossible" for Islanders to "make the first move". He said, "I think there needs to be recognition from their part in the first instance in order to open the door to communications

Vera Baird said she had noticed a "strong feeling" that Islanders are, "...anxious to be good neighbours to Argentina, anxious that Argentina should be good neighbours back" and, ...it is key therefore to keep open every channel of communication that is available."

However she acknowledged the difficulties of being dependant on Argentina's good will and advised Islanders to look elsewhere for future trade opportunities.

New child sex charge

A MAN who faces charges relating to the sexual assault of a child has reappeared in court

In addition to two earlier charges, Robert William Smith now faces an additional charge of intentionally touching a child in a sexual nature.

Petition lodged requesting changed Murrell road route

A PETITION to have the road to Murrell Farm rerouted has been presented to the Environmental Planning Officer.

Signatories want the road to be routed further west than currently planned, to cross at Drunken Rock Pass, not Mastin's Point

Campaigners behind the petition say they have no wish to deny the owners of the Murrell Farm, Adrian and Lisa Lowe, a road to their home as it is "long overdue".

However they say the Murrell estuary is an unspoilt beauty spot and a road at Mastin's Point would disrupt this, bringing with it noise and vehicle pollution. They also say a road across Mastin's Point would, ..no doubt lead to overfishing in a

They say a crossing at Drunken Rock would take the road away from this scenic area and, "...would assist greatly in trout fisheries manage-ment in future."

Andrew Brownlee, one of the campaigners behind the petition, stressed the importance of maintaining the recreational area. He said, We appreciate that a route via Drunken Rock could cost more, but I believe it would be well worth it in the longer term. We lost a huge amount of land around Stanley to

Lisa Lowe of Murrell Farm said she had, "...no real strong feelings," about the route the road will take, however she added, "Personally I think that the Drunken Rock way would be better.

"We've said all along that Black Point or Drunken Rock would be a better place for the road to go - at Mastin's Point it's terribly deep and there could be tide wash problems with culverts there.

The issue is likely to be deferred by the Planning Committee to the Transport Advisory Committee

TAC member, Councillor Ian Hansen said the route was picked because it, "...was the shortest and most economical."

He said if the route were to be reconsidered, "...budget constraints would play a big part - the costing would have to be looked at and the fact that the material at Drunken Rock may not be so good."

ALTHOUGH. I suspect, due more to a lack of other discussion material than actual motivation to delve into constitutional matters, there was nonetheless healthy debate at Tuesday's public meeting on proposals contained in the Constitutional Review.

A discussion which focused on the concept of having an Executive Council consisting of all eight councillors particularly caught my attention as personally I fear that if this were to happen, what little public debate we have

now may die out altogether.

The argument for the proposal seems to centre around the accountability of councillors; in essence each will be solely responsible for their portfolio and as such will be required to address other Executive Councillors on matters relating to that portfolio, thus taking heavier responsibility.

I understand the argument in favour of this but I believe it is outweighed by the pitfalls of having such a set up - mainly that it will mean decisions will continue to be made behind closed doors, something I thought we were meant

avoiding.

Often in the past I have felt that the full opportunity for public debate presented by the live-broadcast Legislative Council meetings is missed, instead of being a window into the workings of government and an insight for the public into which individuals are in favour or against proposals considered by the government, nowadays by the time these issues reach LegCo, councillors have already had their arguments in private.

It gives what I believe to be an inaccurate and irritating message that they

are all in agreement with each other.

I think many were heartened when Councillor Summers asked in his 2001 election manifesto: "Is it really right that major decisions should be taken in General Purposes Committee behind closed doors, then rubber

stamped by ExCo. also behind closed doors?

He continued, "The fundamental principle of Parliamentary democracy is that there should be clear separation between executive authority and the scrutiny functions of elected members (in our case between ExCo and the other elected members) and that non-ExCo members should have and should exercise the right to challenge and question the decisions of the executive in open debate."

At the time, this indication that at least one Member was striving to open doors was reassuring. I believe many constituents feel uneasy about the enclosed existence of General Purposes Committee and the limited openness of Executive Council. The hope was, if Councillor Summers got his way, perhaps we would finally get to hear first-hand the debate which precedes governmental decisions.

But with the proposed new Executive Council set up this hope may no

longer exist

Open government is a concept that the Falkland Islands promotes proudly to the outside world and today's public is more and more demanding of

transparent decision making.

I realise this issue and the many more raised by the review process are still only at the consultative stage but I worry that a proposal for an eight member ExCo would lead to even less public debate and scrutiny and, as a result, greater public unease and suspicion.

I ALWAYS think twice before making critical comment about the military - not only because I think they do a good job but also because I am loath to attract personal hate mail from pro-Forces correspondents.

However, I was dismayed to discover the fire on Stanley common had

been started by the EOD in their mine disposal work.

I realise their work is vital and these men and women carry out a hugely

dangerous task for which we are all grateful.

But this sorry episode highlights the need to seek advice on the weather conditions - and particularly the fire risk - before burning ordnance in tinder-dry areas.

If EOD did seek advice, then who on earth said to go ahead and burn?

News from the public meeting

Loss of lay members would be 'backward'

APPROVAL of a proposal to end the service of lay members on government committees would be a "backward step", a member of the public has told councillors.

The person told the panel of councillors that not making statutory provision for lay members to serve on committees could lead to, "...a dictatorial state of government"

In a report on the Constitutional Review to date, published in *Penguin News* on November 12. Councillor Mike Summers said councillors were largely agreed that authority and decision making in government should be devolved to the "lowest competent level", including from Executive Council to eight Management Committees on which no lay members would serve.

At Tuesday's meeting, Councillor Summers said that, under the proposals for discussion, lay members would serve on advisory panels, reporting to the management committees. He said it was important to determine: "Who at the end of the day makes a decision - who is responsible?"

Councillor Birmingham reminded the meeting that the review is at a consultation stage: "Not all councillors agree with everything; we want feedback."

He explained, "Having got our thoughts together we've come back to the public; there is still the formal consultation process to go through."

The public meeting also discussed the idea of having Executive Council made up of all eight councillors, with each councillor being responsible for an individual portfolio.

Councillor Summers said this system would allow a, "... greater degree of specialisation."

However he added that the stimulation of debate within council has been, "...quite difficult... and I can't guarantee the revised system will change that."

Councillors also used the meeting to urge the public to submit questions for answer at Legislative Council meetings; although Councillor Edwards said *Penguin News* already fills this role to a degree.

'Mixed message' on time off school

THE government was accused of sending out a "mixed message" about school absenteeism at Tuesday evening's public meeting.

Tuesday evening's public meeting.

A member of the public said parents had received a letter from the Director of Education reminding them that unauthorised absence from school is a problem and holidays should not be taken during term time; meanwhile, three students from the Community School have two weeks off school to attend the Commonwealth Youth Games in Australia.

Councillor Jan Cheek, who sits

on the Education Board, said that the law demands that children attend school

She added, "Personally we can believe some of these opportunities can't be missed; someday the law may be changed to reflect this."

Mrs Check said the letter from the Director of Education was prompted by a small number of parents taking their children out of school for one or two weeks at a time and, in one case, five weeks, during their children's GSCE stud-

Dunbar road completed a month early

THE road to Dunbar, on West Falkland, has been completed a month ahead of schedule.

A road building team lead by Nunker Summers reached the settlement on Monday.

Roads Engineer Bob Hancox said the team have carried out, "...an excellent job under sometimes difficult circumstances as the borrow material was very hard to find and win."

Work started in October last year following the move of the accommodation camp from East Falkland.

The road is just over sixteen kilometres long, starting from near the Bailey Bridge, crossing Herbert Stream then travelling through the Sand Grass before meeting up with the old track to cross the hills.

Mr Hancox said, "We have had great co-operation from the various land owners but particularly Danny Donnelly who has looked after the camp when the team were away, run generators, worked planes and generally assisted."

There are a few bits and pieces to tidy up then the team will work on the roads to Port North and Teal River farms before moving their entire set up to Little Chartres to make a start on the road to Dunnose Head

and ultimately Shallow Harbour.

Mr Hancox added, "Whilst the team are setting up at Little Chartres they will also carry out some temporary repairs to the bridge crossing the Chartres River to enable it to be used by light vehicles until such time as a new bridge is established."

THE grounding of a tanker in high winds caused a seven hour drama in Stanley Harbour on Tuesday.

Around eight in the morning, the Panamanian registered tanker, Centaurus, operated by the Lavinia Corporation of Greece and carrying a cargo of some 2000 tonnes of diesel oil for Stanley, touched bottom, while attempting to dock at the Falklands Interim Port and Storage Facility (FIPASS). The ship became fast some 200 yards to the East of the floating dock

The accident happened at low tide and the sea bed at the point of contact was described by Harbour Master, Jon Clark, as "relatively soft". However, this good fortune was threatened by the distinct possibility that as the tide rose, the ship, estimated at between 5000 and 6000 gross tonnes, would be driven further inshore by gale force winds from the North. High tide was expected at around 4.30pm

During the late morning, the local inter-island cargo vessel. MV Tamar F1 took a tow line from the Centaurus in order to prevent the situation worsening, while discussions took place about the next move

In the Falklands with its small population, there is often a shortage of people with specific skills and so a degree of multi-tasking is normal. In this case, master mariner Ian Wilkinson, manager of Island Shipping Ltd, the company that operates the MV Tamar, was also the local pilot aboard the Centaurus at the time it grounded. As negotiations regarding salvage operations began between the captain of Centaurus and the captain of MV Tamar FI lan Wilkinson found himself in a position which he described as "somewhat invidi-

Just before noon, with no let up in the force of the wind, listeners to inter-ship communications heard Captain McNeill of MV Tamar urge the captain of Centaurus to agree to accept Lloyd's Open Form as a preliminary to a salvage attempt being made. lan Wilkinson also urged acceptance, saying that the ship was beginning to 'bump' and that he feared that unless prompt action was taken, it would later be impossible to get the ship off and she could become a "total constructive

Lloyd's Open Form or LOF2000 as it is more commonly

referred to, is Lloyd's of London's standard form of salvage agreement and has its origins in the late 1800's. Over the course of time it has developed into the most widely used international salvage agreement of its kind in the world today, but its acceptance by a vessel in trouble sets in train an arbitration procedure

Eventually, after messages had been exchanged through the local agents for Centaurus to Greece and from Greece to Lavinia Corporation's lawyers in London, the salvage operation began at around 12.20 pm. By 12.23 pm, assisted by two harbour patrol launches acting as tugs, MV Tamar FI had succeeded in pulling the tanker's bow away from the shore and somewhat into the wind. At this point, just after lan Wilkinson had reported. "We seem to be unstuck now," a windlass problem on MV Tamar FI intervened and by 12.30pm the status quo was resumed, with Centaurus once more lying broadside on to the wind and pointing towards the shore

In the hope of a slight reduction of wind strength later in the afternoon, no further attempt to pull the tanker free was made until 2.10 pm. At this point MV Tamar and the two harbour patrol launches, which had maintained station throughout, were joined by two other vessels: the Falkland Islands Company launch Speedwell and the long-retired harbour workhorse, Lively. With launches and Lively pushing from the leeward side and MV Tamar pulling, by 2.20 pm Centaurus was heading into wind and declared "fully afloat" by her relieved pilot.

Clearly had appropriate action not been taken to avoid damage to the ship, there could have been a risk of oil pollution in Stanley harbour. Asked about what might have happened if the ship owners had not accepted the salvage terms, Harbour Master, Jon Clark, said that the government is currently reviewing its powers to intervene in such a situation.

He believed that the Governor had such powers at his discretion at present, but that the process by which these powers could be applied needed to be streamlined. In Britain such powers belonged to the Secretary of State, but could be exercised by his appointed agents in the various coastal regions.

Centaurus' seven hour drama | Telephone dials 999 of own accord



THE residents of a Stanley house escaped from a raging fire in the early hours of Sunday morning. thanks to a quirk in the Cable and Wireless telephone system and the rapid actions of police officers.

The cause of the fire is still under investigation.

A 999 call, which went through to the Police Station was found to be coming from a dead line at the home of Roger and Anne Howells on Davis Street (above)

Police officers visited the address to investigate and, upon discovering the fire, managed to escort the occupants safely out of the house.

Firefighters were called to the blaze just before 3.00am, arriving on the scene within minutes, however by then the fire had firmly taken

Working through the small hours, the firefighters brought the blaze under control; a substantial amount of water was used, estimated to be in the region of more than a hundred tonnes

Debris was then removed to tackle burning under the building.

The firemen worked for around four and a half hours, before eventually leaving the scene just before seven thirty in the morning.

A spokesperson for Cable and Wireless said they had no definite

reason why the telephone would have dialled 999. However they said that if it was an "old design" telephones it is possible that if the phone was partially damaged with the line intact it could have generated a 999

A second fire was reported to the emergency services on Monday and continues to burn on Stanley com-

The blaze began while an Explosive Ordnance Disposal team was detonating a mine which had become exposed within a minefield.

Stanley residents heard a number of explosions as the fire spread, detonating three mines as it progressed.

The fire continues to burn however the Fire Brigade says it is now under control.

Firefighter Andrew Miller said all the team had, "...performed excep-tionally well despite the known dan-

gers."

The fire has spread some two miles to the east of the road to Eliza Cove rubbish dump and the same to the west.

RAF firefighters and members of the Defence Force have both assisted

at the scene. On Thursday evening a watch was

being kept so that any "fingers" of fire escaping the minefield could be quickly extinguished.

New Polar fined for August fuel spill

A FALKLANDS-registered vessel has been fined following a fuel spill in the Vigo estuary in Spain, according to Spanish press reports.

Europa press agency has reported that the Vigo Port Captain has demanded two guarantees to the value of €900,000 from the owners of New Polar following the fuel spill. New Polar is owned by Polar Limited, a joint venture company owned by Seaview Limited and Pescanova.

According to a Spanish government announcement in an answer to the socialist senator Enrique Curiel, the first of the guarantees is €600,000 in value and the second is €300,000

Europa says the contamination happened on August 4 during the provisioning with fuel of New Polar, at Pescanova's jetty in the Port of

According to Europa, following the contamination, the crew of the ship did not inform the competent authorities of the incident and, for this reason, anti-contamination measures could not be taken until the fuel slick was detected in the early hours of August 5, when it was discovered.

At this time, the Vigo Port Captain activated an emergency plan and the incident was declared officially over on August 8.

Meeting of the Education Board

School absence remains a problem

DESPITE high profile coverage over the past year, the level of children's unauthorised absence from school has not diminished.

At their meeting on Friday November 19, members of the Education Board were surprised to discover that the number of unauthorised absences in 2003-2004 had risen in the Infant and Junior School and had remained at the same level as 2002-2003 in the Community School.

Committee members were particularly concerned by the rise in the number of unauthorised absences in Year 10, the first year of GCSE studies.

Director of Education. Mrs Sylvia Cole commented, "Despite the fact this was discussed last year, despite the fact that parents were written to and reminded that unauthorised absence was not acceptable, despite everything that went in the *Penguin News* and over the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station in terms of discussions, nothing seems to have changed radically on those absences, they haven't reduced."

Some board members argued that the Falkland Islands are in a special situation, being an isolated place from which it takes significant time to travel and that it can

be an opportunity to go away to take different "educational advantages." Mrs Cole disagreed: "These are holidays on the whole and really we cannot ever authorise unauthorised absence."

The Director of Education added that she had been irritated to see an article in *Penguin News* on November 19 about children who had taken a Friday afternoon off school to fly home to West Falkland for the weekend.

She said. "All the parents and

She said. "All the parents and the pupils knew that it would be regarded as unauthorised absence; discussions had taken place.

"I think it was hoped originally that a later flight could take place, that they could go out after school, which we would not have had a problem with at all, it's in their own time.

"But it seems a pity to me, and I know I shall be unpopular for saying it, that parents in an orchestrated decision took children out at midday on Friday..."

The Education Board discussed how the Education Ordinance can be enforced to stop such absences and members asked Mrs Cole to meet with the Attorney General, "...to clarify whether the law could be enforced and, if so, how."

Later holiday break up - decision expected today

A PROPOSAL for changes to the school holidays is to be debated by Legislative Council today.

Extensive public consultation was held a year ago and the Director of Education said, "...the general feeling was that people wanted to break up later in December, nearer to Christmas."

If the proposed pattern is approved, the new dates for the 2005/

2006 academic year (beginning September 1, 2005) will be published in the government's Gazette at the end of this month.

Mrs Cole added. "You can't please everybody but on the whole I've tried to meet the concerns that were coming through in the consultation and as far as I know, in 99.9% of the cases, I've met them."

Further and higher education: criteria needs defining

THE criteria for being eligible for further education and higher education funding will hopefully become more clear in future.

The Director of Education and the Attorney General are to work together on firming up eligibility criteria for Falkland Islands residents in light of strict budgeting. Mrs Cole explained, "I think events recently have made coun-

cillors look again, mainly as a result of the shortage of funding but also as a result of different demands on budget, at whether criteria is in fact firm enough or clear enough."

She said that as the issue revolves around residency and status, her work with the Attorney General will be long and "complicated".

Tim achieves Renewable Energy degree

AFTER three years of dedicated study, a Stanley resident has achieved his Master's Degree.

Tim Cotter, who works in Infrastructure Development at the Development Corporation heard from Loughborough University last Friday that he has been awarded with a

master's degree (MSc) in Renewable Energy Systems Technology.

Tim explained that the course normally takes one year of full time study, "...but I spread it over 3 years doing it by a mixture of Distance Learning and some residential attendance at the University."

The final project was based on detailed analysis of the performance of the Proven Wind turbine at Port Louis

Tim sat all his exams in the Falklands, "... with the kind assistance of Sylvia Cole who arranged invigilation of all my eight examinations in Stanley Cottage.

"Due to University rules, most of these exams had to be synchronised to be held at the same instant as those in the UK - 6am is not a good time to start a examination!"

The first step to recovery

I AM writing this letter having been away from the Falkland Islands for over a year.

Marvellous things have happened to me in this year, all down to the fact that I have finally admitted that I am an alcoholic.

I came back to the UK last year bewildered and confused, the only thing I seem to have acknowledged was the fact, that my drink problem seemed to have got worse and that my life was probably at it's lowest ever.

I landed in the UK very frightened, without a job, anywhere to live and not having seen my children for a year, I was in a complete mess

I decided that my life needed to change and the root problem seemed to be alcohol, I decided to ring up an organisation who I cannot name as it is against their traditions.

I was introduced to some of their members who told me that if I was an alcoholic then I was to stay away from that first drink, it was the first drink that got me drunk. In other words when I had that first drink, it would set off a physical craving and I would want more and more. I was also told that it was a two fold illness, that it actually started off in my mind, I actually had an obsession of the mind, which told me I can drink. These two things together, make me an alcoholic.

It all made sense; I could never seem to control my drinking when I started. I would wake up in the morning feeling shame, terror and guilt, swearing blind never to do it again, but I always did, making the same mistake time and time again.

This was the first step in my recovery, admitting I was powerless over alcohol and that my life had become unmanageable.

This was only the start. I will write some more in future weeks if the editor will allow me, as it does me the power of good to talk about it.

On December 7, it will be a year since I had my last drink. isn't that amazing?

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





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


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Electoral law: do you have ideas for change?

AMENDMENTS to the Electoral Ordinance are being proposed by the government and the Attorney General is keen to hear suggestions or ideas for improvement to the existing Ordinance from members of the public as well as their views on the changes proposed in the Bill he has prepared.

An Electoral (Amendment) Bill, together with Explanatory Memorandum, explaining its provisions were published in the Falkland Islands Gazette on 15 November.

A number of important changes to the existing law are proposed by the Bill. These include changes in the residence qualifications for registration as an elector, and would allow a person to apply for his or her name to be entered on the register as soon as he or she obtains electoral qualifications.

Under present law, individuals wishing to register are required to be resident (after taking permitted absences into account) for the twelve months preceeding March 15 in the year in which the Electoral Register is prepared, and to be at least 18 years old on that day. People who would be qualified to go on the register the following day have to wait until the following year

If the proposed amendments are accepted a canvass by post would be made each year of every house in the Falkland Islands. The occupier would be asked to fill in a form listing all the people qualified to vote who resided at that address on 15 March or would have been there but for their absence for some reason which the occupier would be asked to give.

People whose names were on

the old register, and persons whose names appeared on the canvass forms would be deemed to have applied to have their names placed on the new register.

The Attorney General, David Lang, explained "People may be absent because they are on an educational course, they are in hospital, they are a merchant seaman or, importantly, because they are getting more experience in a trade or profession before coming back to the Falkland Islands or they may be working for a time overseas for a local company for a few years. In other words, if they have a permanent home to come back to, they're not away from the Falkland Islands for ever, they haven't sold up and gone, these people will not lose the vote.'

Anybody whose name does not appear on the register could apply to the Registrar General at any time for the register to be amended by including their name and, if the Registrar General is satisfied that the application is in order, the register would be amended immediately, except for a very short period of ten days, for administrative reasons, immediately preceding an election when the register would be amended immediately after the election. These proposals would create a "rolling register".

The Attorney General, Mr David Lang explained, "Say, for instance, on June 15 you've been present at your address for twelve months; you can apply on June 15 for your name to go on the electoral register and that date will then be treated as your qualifying date. You wouldn't have to wait until

the following 15 March."

In particular, this will aid young people who, upon turning eighteen, would then be able to apply at any time of the year for their name to go on the Register of Electors.

Another feature of the Amendment Bill is provision for postal voters in the United Kingdom to send their ballot papers to Falkland House in London.

Mr Lang explained the need for the provision: "The difficulty here, as everybody knows, is getting postal ballot papers out and back in time to be counted at an election"

Mr Lang said that if the Bill is passed, the government hopes to make detailed provisions and regulations to allow, "...ballot papers to be sent electronically to Falkland House and sent by Falkland House to postal voters in the UK who then send them back to Falkland House by polling day and Falkland House, before the close of the poll, emails them back, scanned in, to the Returning Officer in the Falkland Islands.

"Those scanned ballot papers are counted at the count in Stanley."

Another proposed amendment to the Electoral Bill comes as a result of a protest at the 2003 Camp by-election. Mr Lang explained, "We are making provision for a polling station to be in Stanley on the occasion of a Camp by-election when there isn't an election in Stanley.

"The reason for that is to enable Camp voters who are in Stanley on polling day to be able to vote in a Stanley polling station during a by-election."

"What we are not doing is providing for polling stations in Camp if there is a Stanley by-election; the reason for that is purely that there are more likely to be Camp voters in Stanley than there are Stanley voters in Camp on a by-election day...

day...
"The best idea in that scenario is for a Stanley voter likely to be in Camp on the day of a by-election to apply in good time to the Registrar General for someone to vote on their behalf by proxy or to obtain a postal vote."

Mr Lang is interested to hear whether anyone has any other suggestions for amendments to the

electoral law.

He said, "This Bill has been deliberately prepared so that if people feel there should be other changes they can get in contact with me well in time before the Bill goes to Legislative Council in January."

Mr Lang asked that anyone with suggestions for amendments contacts him by Christmas. He can be emailed on bsteen@sec.gov.fk.

Alternatively, he said, "...people can send it to any councillor with a request for it to be sent to me.

"We'll have a look at them and see what we can do. Some of the changes may not be possible to make; I will try to reply to anyone who gives me their name and explain why we might not be able to do it

"But I will bring them all to the attention of Executive Council in any case."

Innovative farmers are taking the 'bull by the horns'

TWO East Falkland farmers have joined forces in the hope of creating a more lucrative business from a traditional Falklands sheep farm.

Ben Berntsen and Riki Evans are unashamedly forward thinking and open minded where farming is concerned and are not afraid to try new concepts They both admit to having broken with tradition on occasion in the past and are preparing to do so again.

Ben purchased Elephant Beach Farm in 1998, at a time when wool prices had been low for a considerable period and with no reason to believe there would be any significant upward change. The unit was an approximately 6.000 hectares farm running 5000 sheep for wool.

Ben had previously spent several years running Stanley Butchery initially as a partnership and finally by

Along with Terence and Carol Phillips. Ben and his partner Violet Clarke were the driving force behind Freshco, the now well-established familiar Stanley butchers. Ben said the concept of Freshco was decided over "a couple of cans of beer" one evening when he and Terence were discussing possible ways to sell farm produce to supplement their income. The obvious solution was to create a retail outlet that would benefit themselves and other farmers.

Enlisting the skills of other farmers who also became shareholders, Freshco was soon up and running and for the first time farmers were obtaining a good price for butchered beef all year round - a break from tradition as locally beef was only slaughtered and sold in quarters during the winter months

"Many farms made a lot of money out of selling beef to Freshco," Ben said, adding that it was all due to Terence's, "...hard work and enthusiasm," that the project got of the

In the meantime the concept of Sand Bay abattoir was in the pipeline and Riki Evans was on the lookcout for farming opportunities.

Employed as assistant manager at Fitzroy, (formerly part of the Falklland Islands Company and now cowned by Falklands Landholdings)

Riki felt stifled by the lack of encouragement offered to young people and the inflexible attitude towards farming. "It was obvious the operation wasn't working but they weren't prepared to change - I could see I ould also end up in a rut" said Riki

Ben and Riki are both directors of the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) and play an active part in the operation. However it has not always been the case - they laughingly recounted the time when they both arrived at the Development Corporation to find out what the hell was taking so long in getting the operation under way and getting money to the farmer.

"We had our gobs shut and eyes opened, in a fairly short space of time when the General Manager Julian Morris and Marketing Manager Connie Stevens sat us down and outlined the problems they were facing at the time," said Ben. "We realised after a lengthy discussion that it would be more benefit to everyone if farmers were to work with FIMCo rather than sit back and criticise."

Grazing for Profit workshops run by the Department of Agriculture some three years ago had got Riki "fired up" and opened his eyes to new ways - but he said the problem was finding the right place to carry out his plans.

Riki had spent a season running Douglas, a farm neighbouring Elephant Beach which resulted in he and Ben discovering that they worked well together and had a lot in common when it came to farming

A further 2,800 hectares of adjoining land had been made available to Ben and Violet following the sale of New House Farm and although they wanted to take it on, Ben said with just the two of them he couldn't see any way of developing it other than to increase sheep numbers and to rely on wool.

Again sitting down and discussing the possibilities with Riki resulted in them, "taking the bull by the horns," and deciding to set up a com-

Riki sold his two 50 acre plots near Fitzroy to raise capital for the venture and, despite warnings from friends and other farmers that it, "will

never work," he and Ben formed EBF

Ben says he is "passionate about farming" and sees the move as a logical way to turn Elephant Beach into a more productive unit

The future for EBF Ltd will undoubtedly hold change. Ben says they both have an open mind to farming opportunities and with Riki's enthusiasm for grazing for profit, farming is their business.

Riki and Ben both extended their thanks to the Department of Agriculture for their more recent work which has encouraged them to "think out side of the dots." Riki said he thought that the long term plan projected by the department was now

"heading in the right direction."

By the end of this season Ben and Riki hope to have disposed of all the mature wethers from Elephant Beach and are looking to buy in ewes to increase numbers to breed lambs. Using Dohne Merino and South African Mutton Merino rams to cover the ewes they hope to quite soon be in a position to provide prime lamb to the abattoir for both the local and export markets.

Although Ben and Violet have been breeding cattle for the local market since the early Freshco days the emphasis now is on finishing the animals to a high standard.

Ben explained that he has purchased weaner calves from both East and West Falkland with the intention of finishing them to a high standard. This is an area of farming that Riki and Ben are both very keen to ex-

I travelled out to Elephant Beach to take a look at this new partnership in action. The idea of being surrounded by a herd of cattle in the middle of camp without a corral fence to sit safely on didn't exactly fill me with great confidence but I humoured business out there waiting to happen them - anyway I was keen to check - convenience food with local prodout their claims that the animals ucts. would come up to a vehicle and eat from their hands.

Think about it, Ben the ex butcher hand feeding steers; you'd think they would be just a little bit suspicious...

So we filled the back of the rover up with hay and drove a short distance along the road to where a large tors of FIMCo. herd of cattle grazed the fresh grass

around a ditch

Heads came up as we bounced down the hill and parked some distance from the herd and, sure enough they looked interested in us. The hay was thrown out and the animals wandered over.

Riki says that when they first started bringing feed out in the winter the animals would "clear off over the hill" not having been handled to any extent in the past. However a break through came with a fall of snow, and hunger made the animals decide that Ben and Riki were friends not foe.

This is important, the farmers assure me, as stress is one of the major factors which contribute to tough meat. "If we are to compete with the quality and price of the imported Uruguayan beef we have to produce a consistent product.

With 102 animals coming on and looking pretty good to my inexperienced eye I queried the availability of a market and sparked a discussion that could last for days.

Ben explained that they sell their animals to FIMCo who slaughter and butcher it to EU standards. The problem is that the bigger market, for example cruise vessels, fishing fleets. restaurants and the British Forces, tend to use imported beef because it is of a recognised quality - a trend that Ben and Riki wish to interrupt.

Both farmers are enthusiastic about their product and the future of beef in the Islands but feel that a break from traditional methods is needed.

Ben suggested it needs someone to further develop the product, citing the amount of sausages, burgers etc that are imported into the Islands as an example.

"We are living in an era of convenience foods and we are importing them; there has to be an entire new







General Practice FIBS Chart Attack

Healthcare behind the scenes

HAVE you ever wondered what happens to your specimen when it is sent to the Pathology Laboratory?

Do you know who tests your pathology specimen? Is it a doctor or a nurse? Well actually neither!

Your pathology specimen is tested by Biomedical Scientists who perform laboratory tests on blood, other body fluids and tissues which assist the clinicians in the diagnosis, treatment and prevention of diseases and other illnesses.

From cancer screening to diagnosing HIV, from blood transfusion for surgery to food poisoning and infection control, biomedical scientists are the foundation of modern healthcare. We work in partnership with doctors, nurses and other healthcare professionals to perform a variety of roles.

If this conjures up images of mad scientists in white coats working in dark, dingy labs, then think again. Yes, we do wear white coats, but we are not mad and we work in modern, bright surroundings, using the latest state-of-the-art equipment.

Here in the Falklands three Biomedical Scientists staff the Pathology Department, working between the various disciplines.

Hacmatology – Here we study the morphology and physiology of blood. Automated machines are used to enumerate the constituent cells of the blood i.e red cells, white cells and platelets, and check for haemoglobin. Blood films are made and treated with special stains so that the cells can be observed

through a microscope to identify any abnormalities. These tests are important in the diagnosis of anaemias and leukaemias. Other investigations include blood coagulation studies. Many patients are required to take warfarin to prevent their blood clotting too quickly. They need to be monitored to ensure that the dosage is correct. Also any deficiency or defect in clotting factors can be detected as in the case of haemophiliacs.

Blood Transfusion – This is where blood groups of patients are determined. Investigations for atypical antibodies are also performed. These could present problems if a transfusion is required, or, in the case of women, if they become pregnant, Also if a patient requires a blood transfusion the blood has to be matched so that they do not suffer any adverse effects.

Clinical Chemistry - This discipline deals with the analysis of blood and other body fluids to check if the body organs are functioning properly, e.g. liver, lungs, heart, kidney, thyroid etc. Automated machines are used so that large numbers of samples can be processed and accurately analysed each day.


Medical Microbiology - This is where disease- causing organisms are investigated. Bacteria, viruses, fungi and parasites are isolated by culturing specimens on suitable culture media. The causative organism is identified and sensitivity tests are performed in order that the doctor knows what bacteria is causing the problem, and which an-

tibiotic can be used to cure the problem. A Public Health Service is also provided within this department where samples of milk, water and foodstuffs are tested to ensure fitness for human consumption, and investigations are made relating to environmental monitoring, e.g contamination levels in Stanley Harbour sea water.

Cytology - Here samples of cellular material from any part of the body are prepared and examined. The best example is the cervical smear screening which is carried out at regular intervals, although non-gynaecological screening is also done. The samples are prepared here but for a number of logistical reasons they have to be referred to a specialised UK establishment.

Histopathology – This department processes samples of tissue from operations and autopsies. Tissue sections are finely cut so that they can be stained and the cellular structures can be viewed under the microscope to detect cancer cells. Some tissue require specialised staining techniques and some require an electron microscope. Again for the reasons stated above the samples are partly prepared here, but has to be referred to an establishment in UK.

Even though you don't see us, we are quietly working away behind the scenes day and night, providing our medical counterparts with important information which is essential for diagnosis, and ultimately recovery of the patient.

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Wool report - week ending November 18 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices in South Africa, Australia and New Zealand increased in value despite the negative impact of a weakening US\$ around the world.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide", prices were up by between 1 and 8 pence per kilogram clean across the entire micron spectrum. The only exceptions were very fine lots, that fell by 3 p/kg clean. Gains were greatest in the critical 22 to 26 micron range. This weeks increases are on top of significant rises in the previous week as well. The two-week gains now represent rises in excess of 10 pence per kilogram clean for some micron categories. This is obviously very good news for Falkland Island farmers.

In New Zealand last week there was an 85% clearance of the 14,662 bales on offer while in South Africa 95% of the 10,924 bales presented to the trade were sold. In Australia 86% of the 61,191 bales offered for sale were purchased. Included in the offering were 6,626 bales of crossbred wool of which 89% were sold.

BAS announces design finalists

THREE winning concept designs for a new research station in Antarctica were announced on Wednesday at the Halley VI Design Exhibition at the Royal Institute of British Architects (RIBA).

From six short-listed teams, a jury panel selected three winning designs for the British Antarctic Survey's new Halley VI Research Station.

British Antarctic Survey Director and Chair of the Jury Panel, Professor Chris Rapley CBE, announced the winning teams as: Buro Happold and Lifschutz Davidson; FaberMaunsell and Hugh Broughton Architects; Hopkins Architects and Expedition Engineers.

He said, "It was an extremely difficult decision for the panel to choose three teams as all six concept designs showed tremendous ingenuity meeting our requirements. The three winners demonstrate real innovation in their approach to the Halley VI Research Station, which must be functionally efficient yet an aesthetically stimulating place to work.

The panel selected Buro Happold and Lifschutz Davidson for their concept of linked spacestation-like structures on jackable legs

They were impressed by the thought given to the living space and how staff would have quiet, private areas as well as community

The architectural features are complemented by comprehensive engineering, which offers a practical solution to living and working.

Special attention has been given to construction, maintenance, dealing with the annual build up of snow, and how the station can be relocated - overall, a concept that can be developed into a practical and cost effective research station.

Engineers FaberMaunsell and Hugh Broughton Architects were selected for a strong architectural

The modular approach enables units to be linked together to form a station that can accommodate user requirements and be easily relocated. The depth of thought given to the construction phase particularly impressed the panel.

Hopkins Architects and Expedition Engineers "walking building" demonstrated an innovative approach to relocating the structures.

The panel reflected on the challenges to be overcome in realising the design, but considered the overall concept to be achievable. The team has taken care in matching the sustainability requirements outlined in user documents and how new materials can be introduced to Antarctica.

The three teams will have a site visit in January 2005, before developing their ideas.

A winning design will be announced in September 2005.

Four qualify as poolside helpers



FT demands strong action from IMF against Argentina

BRITAIN'S Financial Times (FT) has severely criticised Argentina for its current handling of defaulted debt and suggests the IMF "must be prepared to halt new lending."

Too many exceptions have been made already. Argentina's behaviour is setting dangerous precedents for future default situations. writes FT.

Argentina's Finance Minister Roberto Lavagna is currently involved in restructuring the 103 billon US dollars defaulted debt (capital and interest) with private bond holders and has promised to present in the coming weeks the final offer.

Originally Argentina proposed a 75% cut to bondholders which was rejected and since then has been devising new mechanisms which however do not attract or convince private creditors. The FT's scathing editorial follows:

'Argentina would be well advised to enter constructive negotiations on how its offer might be improved. If it fails to do so, and consequently fails to win overwhelming backing for the restructuring deal, the IMF must be prepared to halt new lending. Too many exceptions have been made already. Argentina's behaviour is setting dangerous precedents for future default situations"

'Roberto Lavagna, Argentina's Economy minister, has enjoyed playing tough thus far. He has certainly succeeded in showing the world that sovereign borrowers are far from powerless in their dealings with private creditors. Creditors will have to take a big haircut as part of a restructuring deal. Indeed the difference between the offer Argentina is willing to make, roughly 30 cents in the dollar, and what might be the maximum feasible amount, is probably not huge.

Yet its handling of the process has violated norms of transparency and cooperation. Threatening indefinite default on debt owned by holdouts is unacceptable. The structure of the deal is too clever by half. Bank of New York was right to walk away from it.

"Argentina's confrontational approach is all the more senseless considering growth is strong, exports and reserves high, and the fiscal surplus exceeds government forecasts. It is no longer acting in desperation."

Whatever policymakers may think, default is not cost free. Confidence would be hit and next year's growth undermined. Longer term, Argentina would pay the price in missed investment needed to support ongoing development.

The IMF is on hold while the restructuring offer proceeds. Fair enough. But it must make clear to Argentina that it will require a high level of acceptance from creditors to continue lending, 80% might be reasonable. Every 10% holdout is 10 billion US dollars debt litigated in the courts. The IMF must also hold Argentina to its other pledges to pursue structural reform which have fallen behind schedule

If the IMF does stop lending, Argentina may default on its multilateral borrowing too. So be it. The IMF's credibility is at stake and the US Treasury must this time stand behind it. Those emerging markets which play the rules, en-dorsed by the G-20 at the weekend, must see that their behaviour does not put them at a disadvantage compared with the likes of Argentina. If the US wants to do something for Latinamerica, neighbouring Brazil is a worthier candidate.

Boost for Montevideo

AROUND 15 vessels from Spain will arrive before the end of the year and are expected to make Montevideo's port activity more dynamic, generate hundreds of jobs, and yield around USD 300,000 per vessel for the coun-

These vessels will join around 20 Korean tuna vessels that have been docked at port for a few months.

A total of 4,900 tonnes will be landed onto 160 refrigerated containers, which will require hiring more than 100 dockers.

Once the landing operations are completed, the vessels will remain at Montevideo's port in order to be inspected, painted, and repaired.

Each vessel will yield around USD 300,000 for the country, generated from landing expenses from catches, repairs, and the restocking of provi-


The high fuel value makes it impossible for the vessels to go back to their countries of origin and thus Montevideo has become an inevitable nexus between the fishery grounds in the South Atlantic and Spain. "A round trip for one of these vessels to Vigo is USD 140,000 in fuel and it demands 30 days, so they opted to send crews by plane. It is cheaper, quicker and they save 30 days of navigation of life onboard. said a Uruguayan businessman.

Mail expected today

THE backlog of airmail to the Falkland Islands is still yet to clear.

Following the arrival of only a small quantity of airmail on Monday's flight from the UK, the Chief Executive released a statement apologising for, "...the continued breakdown of new systems introduced by the UK Royal Mail which have resulted in no mail arriving.

He added however that the government had, "...received an assurance that all mail was despatched but was too late to connect with

the flight.

The mail, totalling around 173 bags and weighing about 950 kilos is now expected to arrive on today's flight. Mr Simpkins said that a categoric assurance is also being sought that the problems of the last two months have been permanently resolved by the Royal Mail and that Falkland Islanders can expect the resumption of a normal service in the lead-up to Christmas and from now on.

He added, "I would like to emphasise that staff at the Stanley Post Office have been doing their very best in difficult circumstances.

The problems are not of their making (they are waiting for post

Quark case adjourned

FALKLANDS Councillor and Director of Quark Fishing Ltd Mike Summers was again in court on Wednesday to hear his company's legal representative enter pleas to a series of charges.

Hugh Ferguson of Ledingham Chalmers, representing Quark Fishing and Freiremar AS, entered pleas of not guilty to all the charges, which relate to incidents alleged to have taken place between May 4


and June 28, 2004.

As charterers of the fishing vessel Ibsa Quinto, Quark Fishing is accused of being in breach of licence conditions having taken 33 tonnes of fish above the total allowable catch (TAC) of 300 tonnes. The Spanish company Freiremar AS is charged with similar offences as owners of the *Ibsa Quinto*.

Quark Fishing is also charged, as owners of the fishing vessel Jacqueline, with being in breach of regulations designed to minimise the incidental mortality of seabirds on or about June 6.

The cases have been adjourned until February 9; a trial is expected to take place at the end of April or in early May 2005.

THE Falklands team at the Commonwealth Youth Games in Bendigo, Australia have overcome nerves to smash their own records personal bests'

The team suffered a set back early this week when swimmer Hannah Arthur-Almond (14) was diagnosed with Glandular Fever; despite her illness however Hannah was still hoping to compete in the 50m Freestyle event in the early hours of this morning.

Her swim team mate Edward Freer (15) has been kept busy with a host of events.

While none of the team expected to be in medal contention, any disappointment at their placings was replaced with pride at their improved personal bests.

On Wednesday Edward competed in two races and, according to team manager Steve Dent, he "literally blitzed" his personal bests.

Steve explained, "His qualifying time for the 200m Freestyle was 2:59.28. The official time (on Wednesday) was a blistering 2:41.36, the best part of 18 seconds faster than previously." Edward then competed in the 200m Breastroke event and with a previous time of 3:22.00 he managed to again better that with a time of 3:19.40.

Yesterday Edward was joined in the pool by Dion Robertson (14). Steve said Dion was first out looking "very nervous at the start of ing, "...very nervous at the start of the 100m Freestyle event." Dion's qualification time for this event was 1:25.21 and he managed to slash

eight seconds off his previous best finishing in 1:14.57. In his heat Edward, who qualified at 1:14.2, finished in 1:11.02.

The 50m Breastroke was up next and again Dion stepped out into the blocks first. He qualified in 54.48 seconds and managed to beat this again with an impressive 46.93 seconds. Edward also continued the run of successes slashing two seconds off his previous best of 42.77, swimming in 40.74 seconds.

Swimming coach Pam Freer said, "They have exceeded all of our expectations by taking so much off their times. We are also very pleased that so far all their swims have been 'clean' swims.

"All of this just proves how a little bit of competition can stretch them and inspire them to do better.'

Runner Roxane Morrison (17) also competed on Thursday, in her first and only event on the track. the 400m. Seeded in heat two against strong opposition, including the Scottish representative from the 2002 Commonwealth Games, Roxane was nervous at the start. However Steve said she started well and managed to finish in a "very credible" time of 74.14 seconds.

He commented, "I was very

pleased with her final time and that she has managed to beat her previous personal best."

The final day of events, which took place last night Falklands-time, had Dion, Edward and Hannah all competing. Reports from these races will be in Penguin News next week.

Commenting on the Stanley Services meeting. His Excellency the Governor Mr Howard Pearce commented. "It appears that the outstanding issues have now been resolved. Some further work needs to be completed. A public announce-ment will be made in due course."

Mr Pearce said Executive Council considered written advice from Counsel, "...in relation to the recent decisions by the Court of Appeal in the Gordon Forbes arbitration case.

He commented, "Since aspects of the case remain before the courts, it is not possible to make any further statement at this stage.


THE cruise ship Shokalskiy (carrying 42 passengers) will call into Sea Lion Island today before heading around to Stanley tomorrow.

HMG it certainly appears there are questions to be asked of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

Whether intentional or not, their move to alter our level of internal self-governance indicates something is amiss and it's clearly starting to

The wording of the Mining Bill to which Councillor Summers referred in LegCo was indeed worrying in that it appears to assign almost all authority to the Governor directly. As one correspondent put it to me: "The 'Governor' is usually defined as 'Governor advised by Executive Council' but the clear intent (of this Bill) is to ensure that everything to do with mineral exploration and exploitation is directly controlled by the British Government.

Such interference in our affairs can only serve to impair our endeavours towards self-governance which is the keystone of our right to self-

Perhaps the problem stems from the Foreign Office unintentionally categorising us with other, shall we say, less scrupulous Overseas Territories and this mixed message we seem to be receiving is the result. It might merely be a temporary blip.

Or is that just a little naive?

Whatever, whether by coincidence or not, it's unfortunate that, right when we're on the receiving end of Argentine interference, the FCO appears to be undermining in this way our right to self-determination, which they have hitherto championed so strongly.

This matter must to be resolved - we need to know exactly where we

stand.

I NORMALLY try to avoid discussions on the theme of the Falklands turning into a bureaucratic "little England" - mainly because I don't subscribe to that slightly paranoid idea.

However, I really had to wonder what the place is coming to when I discovered that the Explorer Scouts have had to cancel their excursion to the Camber, where they were going to repaint the names of the ships.

To hear that the landowner, a dyed in the wool Islands company, had not given permission for them to do so, worryingly indicates to me that the 'paranoid' few might actually be right.



No change to miltary commitment

THE Commander of British Forces has reassured Islanders about, ...the "level of military commitment to the Falkland Islands.

Speaking to the motion for adjournment at last week's meeting of Legislative Council, Air Commodore Richard Lacey commented. "Many will be aware that plans were announced a couple of months ago to restructure the forces in the United Kingdom and some of those will involve reductions in manpower.

"But I am pleased to say there are currently no plans to change the size of the force package which I have under my command at Mount Pleasant.

Mr Lacev also addressed rumours that, due to exercise commitments, a large number of troops would be using the Air Luxor airbridge, therefore reducing seat availability to civilians.

He commented, "I would like to give my categorical assurance that the normal contracted number of seats will be available to the Falkland Islands Government and to the Falkland Islanders.

Open Door licences for Borders and Southern

FIVE new Open Door Production Licences have been issued to Borders and Southern Petroleum by the Falkland Islands Government.

According to the latest newsletter of the Department of Mineral Resources, Borders and Southem Petroleum received the licences on November 1.

The newsletter quotes a spokesperson for Borders and Southern as saying the company is, "...very pleased to have been awarded five production licences, covering an area of 19,598 sq km, in the South Falkland Basin.

The company aims to test the hydrocarbon potential of the "fold belt trend" located north of the Burdwood Bank, "...and is looking forward to starting its work programme and working closely with the people of the Falkland Islands."

Borders and Southern Petroleum is a UK based oil and gas exploration company with offices in St James' Square in London.

The company will be applying for admission to the London Stock Exchange's Alternative Investment Market (AIM) in the first half of 2005

Gordon is lucky *SunuSday Crvel Hilux winner

STANLEY'S Gordon Peck is the lucky winner of a £7,000 Toyota HiLux Surf up for grabs in the Falklands Suite Lottery.

The lottery was drawn live on air on the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station last week.

Change of policy in the Foreign Office?

COUNCILLORS are "disturbed" by what appears to be moves to change the balance of authority between the Falkland Islands Government and the Foreign Office.

In his motion for adjournment speech at Legislative Council last Friday. Councillor Mike Summers said the balance of authority needs

to be "better defined"

He commented, "It's perfectly clear in the White Paper that Overseas Territories should be self-goveming to the maximum extent pos-

To my mind, the maximum extent possible means that you carry on increasing your level of internal self-government until such time as you are no longer capable of doing it or you appear to be doing some-

thing wrong.
Nobody has said to us at any point that we are not capable of running our own internal affairs in the ways that we have been doing and I haven't yet spotted anything substantially wrong.

"So, what we will need to do is try and better define the balance of authority.

Councillor Summers referred to a Bill which was withdrawn from the agenda for Friday's Legislative Coun-cil meeting: "The Mining Bill which was pulled at relatively short notice because councillors remain unsausfied that the level of authority provided to the Secretary of State and indeed to the Governor in that Bill is more than is appropriate in a coun-

try that is running its own affairs..."
He added, "...if there has really been a change in policy in the Foreign Office then we need to know, they need to tell us.

'If there hasn't, we need to know

why somebody thinks there is.

Watch out for tampered cash machines | Centaurus: no environmental action needed

THE bank in Stanley is warning anyone planning a visit to the United Kingdom this Christmas to be aware that criminals in London are targeting cash machines or (Automatic Teller ATMs Machines), particularly in underground stations.

The thieves have been fitting portable card readers to the machines which "clone", or copy, the card details.

Standard Chartered Bank manager, Nick Hutton, said the cloning device is attached with double sided tape to the point at which the card is inserted and to the unsuspecting eye may not look any different

from a standard cash point machine. However these photos show how a Barclays cash machine looks before and after a cloning device has been fitted.

Mr Hutton advises anyone who becomes aware a device may have been fitted to contact the police, .. and should you suspect that you have inserted your card into a cloning device you are best advised to contact the card issuer so that steps may be taken to avoid any cloned information being misused.

"It is probably not wise to tamper with the cloning device in case the criminal is standing nearby.'

A RISK assesment carried out during last weck's stranding of the tanker Centaurus in Stanley Harbour determined that a pollution containment plan did not need to be put into action, the government's Marine Officer has confirmed.

Penguin News contacted Mr Jon Clark to ask why such a plan was not implemented upon the single hulled vessel's stranding, in anticipation of

Mr Clark said the decision not to immediately deploy containment booms was based on a risk assessment and the perceived priorities.

He explained, "The Centaurus was stranded over about one third of her length from aft. The forward section remained affoat. Although weather conditions were fairly extreme, the vessel was lying fairly quietly on a relatively soft area of seabed.

"The priority was to re-float the Centaurus as soon as possible on the afternoon flood tide. The longer she remained stranded increased the risk of rupturing her hull.

The deployment of booms

would have meant diverting assets away from the re-floating attempt where they were most needed. Had the attempt to re-float her during the afternoon of 23 November failed, apart from increasing the risk of hull failure and pollution, it would have led to further decisions as to whether to contain the the ship with booms or deploy them to nearby wildlife sites.

Mr Clark said the bulk of the Centaurus' cargo was diesel oil, which is, "...volatile and low viscosity and therefore almost impossible

to recover.

He said in a high energy envi-ronment such as the Falkland Islands, a spill of diesel oil would dissipate fairly quickly. "The use of dispersants is irrelevant in shoal water and is not effective on low viscosity oils.

Mr Clark added that the Falk-land Islands Oil Spill Contingency Plan contains a warning on the danger to crews in deploying oil containment booms in conditions where the wind speed exceeds Force 5 on the Beaufort Scale.

Q: WOULD FIG have sold the Doctor's House at Fox Bay to a non- 'belonger' if a local bid had not been received?

During a year when FIG has made drastic cuts, was consideration given as to how the extra £3000 (as bid by another tenderer) could have been utilised to offset some of those budget restrictions?

A: Our thanks to Falkland Islands Government Secretary Pete King for providing the following answer.

The answer to the first part of this (somewhat hypothetical) question is that FIG might have sold the house to a non-belonger if no local bid had been received.

That would of course depend on the price offered, and what they proposed to do with the property. The Tender Board always has the option to recommend that items are retendered at a later date as an alternative to accepting a current offer.

They can also recommend that

Government property is retained and made use of in some other way if tenders received are considered too low, or unacceptable for some other reason.

No consideration was given by the Tender Board as to how the extra £3000 could have been utilised, if they had accepted the highest bid, as that is not their function. Had the higher tender been accepted the "extra £3000" would have been paid into general revenue (i.e. into the Consolidated Fund) like all other monies paid into Government. Price is obviously an important consideration, but is one of several factors taken into account when considering bids

With regard to the Doctor's House, preference was given to a lower bid from a young family who plan to renovate the property and move to live in Camp, thus supporting Islands Plan policy No 7

for Government assets.

Fag Ash Blondes take The Grey Test

Executive Council round-up

Director of port ops to be recruited

EXECUTIVE Council has considered a paper outlining the current situation about development of port infrastructure in the Falkland Islands.

The paper also contained a number of recommendations on the

way forward.

ExCo agreed that FIPASS and adjacent government land should be the long term focus of port development and port operations, and that a Director of Port Operations should be recruited by the middle of next year to manage and develop the port on a commercial basis.

His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce reported, "It is envisaged that a Port Authority or similar body should be established in due course to represent the interests of FIG and port users

Meanwhile, funding should be provided for essential maintenance and repairs to FIPASS, and plans should be made for its phased replacement in the longer term.'

It was also decided that tenders should be invited for the management of FIPASS from September 1,

Mr Pearce added, "The discussion paper considered by EXCO goes into these issues in more detail, and is being published."

Coin to commemorate Battle of Trafalgar

LOOKING forward to the bicentenary of the Battle of Trafalgar and of the death of Admiral Nelson in October next year, Executive Council has agreed a recommendation from the Financial Secretary that a special one crown denomination coin should be minted to commemorate the event.

The Governor reported, "Members agreed that this was especially

appropriate because of the link between events in the Falkland Islands in 1770 and Horatio Nelson's decision to join the Royal Navy in the following year.

The minting of the coin will be carried out by the Pobjoy Mint. Such commemorative coins bring useful income to the Falkland Islands Gov-

Relaxation of criteria for training eligibility

NEW criteria has been approved for training.

Two papers prepared by the Director of Education were considered by ExCo. The first recommended the relaxation of the criteria for eligibility for training in order to make training available to non-Falkland Islands Status holders working in the private sector in certain limited circumstances.

The second paper recommended the creation of special customised trainceships in order to help young people with special educational needs to secure access to employment.

Two new firework codes to provide guidance

CODES covering the use and the sale of fireworks have been considered by ExCo.

The two codes have been drawn up in consultation with the Chief Police Officer and the Chief Fire Of-

The Governor commented. "Members of ExCo agreed that the

codes would provide useful guidance to members of the public and approved them for issue.

"The codes will be given wide publicity, and should help to ensure that the public can enjoy firework displays while avoiding the risk of in-

Approval for Power Station heat recovery system

EXECUTIVE Council has examined a proposal for the recovery of waste heat from Stanley's power station for supply to the Falkland Islands Community School and the King Edward Memorial Hospital.

An assessment of the proposal prepared by the Director of Public

Works indicated that the cost - of just under £200,000 - would bring significant savings in running costs and should pay for itself in less than two years.

The Governor said ExCo therefore gave the project its "enthusias-

tic approval.

Two building plots up for sale at the old BFFI site

TWO plots in the building development of the old BFFI site, to the rear of Racecourse Road, are to be

offered for sale to the public.
The Governor said, "The houses currently being erected on that site are for Diplomatic Service staff working at Government House.

"Executive Council decided that the other two plots should be offered for purchase by the public.

FIG will be looking for a purchase price which reflects the costs to government of providing services to these plots.


New veterinary fees to discourage out of hour calls

We are now looking into a possible alternative venture for our community project.



They are what you feed them

Locum veterinarian Joe Hollins advises on nutritional care for your furry friends

MANY of you will have seen the TV programme 'You are what you eat', which drives home the importance of good nutrition and the horrendous effects of getting it wrong.

The same is true for our four legged companions, dogs and cats. And it is perhaps more important that we get it right for them since we removed them from their natural hunting grounds, domesticated them, and now dictate what goes in their mouths. By not being aware of what they would have eaten naturally, what in fact they have evolved to cat, we can get it so wrong as to damage their health and quality of life, or even worse — in the case of cats — kill them. Startling news indeed!

This article will concentrate mainly on cats, not only because they are by far and away the most popular pets here in the Islands, but also because of their particular dietary sensitivities. But first, our canine friends

The dog is by instinct a natural scavenger, with a good nose for tracking down a supper, a very undiscerning palate, and a cast iron stomach. The dog, which we think of as a carnivore, is closer to an omnivore and can even be a vegetarian – although we would never recommend it.

Unfortunately it is the dog's careless eating habits that is often its undoing, and any vet can recall cases of canine bowels obstructed with stones, bones, plastic toys or com cobs (coated in butter and the perfect plug, they are one of the commonest foreign bodies in the UK). It does, though, make the dog easier to feed.

Cooked or clean raw meat (and veg) is fine, but should always be balanced by at least some proprietary dog food, canned or dry, at regular if not daily intervals. This will provide vitamins, minerals and trace elements otherwise missing. Fortunately the mammal is well designed to compensate; dietary deficiencies take relatively long to develop, but are rapidly corrected with even small intakes of the necessary ingredients.

Complete dry food is the great breakthrough in nutrition and the gold standard. It doesn't go off or attract flies, it's fully balanced, keeps the other end firm and regular, and cleans the teeth. Realistically though in the Falklands, where mutton is cheap and plentiful, feeding just dry food is expensive. At least use it as a supplement and it can be very surprising. That perfectly well dog that you think has no deficiencies suddenly grows a glossy coat, and a good coat is symbolic of good inner health.

Cuts of sinewy meat, the excellent rawhide chews, and bones, also clean the teeth. The feeding of bones though is a contentious issue. Many dogs are fed bones without a hitch, but much depends on the type of bone and the dog's ability to deal with it. Farm dogs accustomed to bones like to pick and chew, whereas the pet dog fed bones as a treat tends to wolf them down. Disaster, when it strikes, ranges from the minor sheared teeth; to the potentially dangerous - severe constipation; and the outright calamitous - obstructed and perforated bowels. Smaller crunchy bones - which includes sheep and poultry bones unfortunately - are more likely to obstruct. Beef bones such as large marrow bones are generally considered the safest.

The cat, in contrast, has an utterly discerning palate, is disdainful of rank food, and needful of a high protein diet. It is a little tiger, a hunter and predator, that deigns to live with you. There are, in the words of a renowned nutritionist, no vegetarian cats, because a vegetarian cat is a dead cat. It is an obligate carnivore; it must have meat to survive. Which, ironically, is where we go wrong. Feed a non-hunting cat a pure meat diet and it may also die. A conundrum then? Not really — it's all a matter of balance.

Logically, thinking back to what a cat has evolved to eat in the wild – rodents, birds, moths and other insects – it would seem that all you have to do is feed meat and all would be well. But of course the cat is also eating skin and hair, bones, and organs - raw liver, for example, is full of iron and vitamins A, D and E (too much though causes vitamin A and D toxicity). This fills in the gaps of its dietary requirements.

There is an understandable temptation here in the Falklands to just feed mutton and fish – plentiful, cheap, and beloved by cats. But this is the road to ill health. Few people realise that flesh is virtually devoid of any calcium (Ca), and that gut absorption is strictly tied to phosphorus (P) and vitamin D. Cats need a Ca.P ratio of 1:1, similar to that of whole prey. Meat alone has a potentially disastrous ratio of just 1:20.

Why is this so important? Calcium plays a pivotal role in the body, not only in maintaining good strong healthy bones, but also in controlling muscle contraction and cardiac function. So critical is it that blood levels are maintained, the body has evolved a specific gland just for calcium control, the parathyroid.

A dietary deficiency forces the parathyroid to rob and deplete the bones of their calcium stores, otherwise convulsions and heart failure may ensue. In young growing kittens – the worst scenario – this pro-

duces flimsy bones that buckle and fold like wet cardboard. Even dogs, dietarily more robust, can develop a condition called rubber jaw in which it is possible to squeeze the two halves of the mandible together like a bendy toy.

Cats have another very specific dietary requirement, a protein building block or amino acid called taurine that dogs and we humans can happily synthesise. It wasn't so long ago that the commonest heart problem of the cat was a mouthful of a condition called dilated cardiomyopathy, but the nutritionists researching and developing complete foods discovered to their surprise that it was simply caused by taurine deficiency. Almost overnight the condition was consigned to history

Taurine deficiency also causes blindness, so all commercial cat foods are fully supplemented. Fortunately meat and fish does contain taurine but vegetable matter has none, so problems only arise when people feed cereal based dog foods to cats. It is one of several reasons why cat food and dog food should not be interchanged – they really are different.

So the same goes for cats as it does for dogs. At least supplement their dish with a good commercial food, ideally the gold standard; complete dry food.

And finally, a word about pregnancy. Does a pregnant dog or cat require more food or calcium to support her growing babies? The answer is: no, not a lot. Even in late pregnancy the foetal skeletons contain little calcium and overfeeding may result in obesity and birthing problems. Feed to body condition, but even with reasonable sized litters they should only need up to 1.5 times their normal food requirements during the last third of pregnancy.

Lactation is a different story. Lactation is metabolically highly demanding. Peak lactation is at about three weeks when the puppies or kittens are growing fast but are not yet weaned. In the bitch especially this can cause eclampsia, convulsions due to low blood calcium, because nature will always try to provide for the next generation at the expense of the mother. It is avoided not necessarily by calcium supplementation, but by keeping up the mother's body condition. At this point she may require feeding up to four times her normal food requirement through balanced meals several times daily.

Take these simple dietary precautions and hopefully you will have a pet with healthy teeth, eyes, bones and heart, a glorious glossy coat, a strong immune system and a better life expectancy.

Is three month old heifer's conception a record?

FARMERS worried about their herd fertility could take a leaf out of farmer Jimmy Forster's book. Locum Veterinary Officer Joe

Locum Veterinary Officer Joe Hollins was called out to Bold Cove in early November to perform an emergency caesarian on an ET (Embryo Transplant) heifer that had not quite reached her first birthday.

Sarah Bowles of the Veterinary Department said Jimmy had noticed the heifer "bagging up with milk" a few days before but when nothing happened, became concerned. It was with some surprise that she was found to be carrying a full term bull calf weighing some 23kg.

The calf had unfortunately died

in utero since its sheer size made it impossible for the heifer to deliver. Sarah said the calf was removed by caesarian section and, "...we are glad to report that the mother is doing well."

The heifer conceived at the extraordinarily precocious age of three months. Is this a record?

Tax Bill prompts debate

THREE Bills were passed by Legislative Council last week; two went through without a hitch but the third prompted substantial debate.

The Education (Amendment) Bill 2004 and the Media Trust (Amendment) Bill were both passed. The first follows extensive public consultation and moves the date on which the school Summer Holiday begins closer to Christmas.

The Chief Executive explained, "It will mean that Camp Sports Week will fall in the half term holiday in the second term of the academic year, that is the first term during the calendar year and that this term will be divided into two unequal portions from now on.

"It will mean that some public holidays which currently fall in half term holidays will, in future, fall within term time."

The Media Trust (Amendment) Bill 2004 increases the potential number of trustees serving on the Media Trust from five to nine and also provides that there shall be no less than three.

The Taxes (Amendment) Bill 2004 caused debate in Legislative Council and of four principle issues covered by the amendments, only three were accepted by Members.

The Financial Secretary, Mr Derek Howatt, outlined the issues: "Firstly, the provisions of Clause Two would prevent Forestry from being taxed as if it were a trade. Forestry provides difficulties for a tax regime in that profits do not arise for many years. Forestry commonly throws up losses, which if treated as ordinary losses can distort a person's tax position.

"Although forestry is not a major concern in the Falkland Islands, it is possible for tax payers resident in the Falkland Islands to have foreign investments, including forestry. Accordingly, in order to prevent a loss to the Falkland Islands Exchequer, it is proposed that forestry should cease to be treated as a business for Falkland Islands tax purposes. This means that the losses accruing from the forestry business will not be allowed against any income taxable in the Falkland Islands. And, any profits arising from forestry will not be taxable here, either. This follows similar provision made some years ago in the United Kingdom.

He continued, "Secondly, Clause Three changes the timeframe within which Employers are required to give the End of Year Certificate to Employees and the Taxation Office. This certificate states the amount of earnings and payments on account of tax deductions made from the Employee's salary during the year. And, at present, it has to be given to the Employee and the Taxation Office by January 7 in the following year. This is a very short time for Employers and the Taxation Office in practice to allow some leeway. The clause will give the Employer the whole of January to send its Certificates, which will help Employers without prejudicing the interests of Employees.

"Thirdly, Clause Four introduces a formal requirement for persons liable for tax to keep sufficient records to substantiate the figures in a tax return. This will mean that they must keep accounting records to substantiate their accounts. Where the income or loss stated is based on accounts, they must keep other records necessary to substantiate figures in their tax computation, if any.

"And, fourth, Clause Five makes new provisions with respect to the taxation of Government Employees recruited in the Falkland Islands and working in the Falkland Islands Government Office in London. This will allow such employees who are deemed to be resident in the Falkland Islands and subsequently entitled to full Personal Allowances. It will also allow their London Allowance to remain exempt from tax."

Councillor Birmingham proposed Clause Two of the Bill be deleted. He explained, "...although in the Falkland Islands it is unlikely that any Forestry project would ever take off to anything substantial, and there are areas in the world where forestry is profitable. I think that if a First World rated country such as Australia, or any Western country...had within their tax regime a system whereby forestry was treated as a business then, in that case, we shouldn't be in effect, double taxing that business.

"The way I read this is that we will just wipe this out completely and although we wouldn't be taxing any profit... we wouldn't be allowing any losses either."

He continued, "I don't see why we should change it at this moment in time. Going back to what I am saying, there are businesses in the world – forestry businesses that are profitable - and they may well be a profit to the Falkland Islands in the future."

Councillor Summers said that while he "entirely" concurred with the sentiments of the Taxation Office in proposing Clause Two, "...l appreciate and accept that if the Falkland Islands Government is never going to participate in the profits from a particular enterprise, nor should it lose potential taxation revenue by allowing the costs.

"However, I think there are issues of policy that underlay this particular decision that are perhaps more far-reaching. And, I think that we need to consider those further.

"It may be that we were not sufficiently vigilant when we agreed the policy on this in Executive Council for remission to the House. It may equally be that the further future implications of it were not brought to our attention.

"Whatever the case may be, I would feel uneasy about passing this particular clause in this Bill at the present time without further discussion of the policy the broader policy not just to do with forestry but to do with the way that we treat tax jurisdictions in other parts of the world."

Clause Two was deleted and the Bill was then passed by Members.

Seatbelts: Luxton proposes extension of amnesty

THE issue of seatbelts legislation hasn't been forgotten, Councillor Luxton has said.

He commented, "People will, no doubt, be aware of some of the issues that have come to light regarding the carriage of children in vehicles after the change in legislation we had earlier this year. I would like to take this opportunity to reassure people it hasn't been forgotten and is under discussion

"A working group has been formed to discuss the issues and at the moment, I think the Attorney General is preparing a detailed submission to come back to that group, following which, a revised piece of legislation will, no doubt, be put forward.'

However he pointed out that as the amnesty period originally suggested for six months expires at the end of December, and there is no prospect of the issue being resolved

by then, "... I think the only practical solution will be to extend the amnesty for a further period, until the deliberations on the subject are com-

Another issue which is slowly progressing is the Fisheries Bill. Councillor Cockwell commented. things are moving but not as fast as any of us would like."

Hell's Kitchen 'lifeline' must be repaired

He continued, "I must admit I haven't been up there for some time but it is something that I am going to look into and find out what happened.

Councillor Hansen said he agreed that something needs to be done about the state of the road at Hell's Kitchen as it is "a lifeline"

"I would hate to think that any future Governments would cut overseas visits to the extent that we isolate ourselves in the Falklands and don't make our position clearly known to the rest of the world and to the MPs in the UK.

She added. "I would say to the people that find that overseas visits Councillors on their behalf are not what they want, next year is a big opportunity to put your money where your mouth is; stand for Council and stand up and be counted.

"If you think you can do a better job, get on with it.

Councillor Luxton stressed the importance of "pushing the Falklands cause overseas." If we don't, he said, we aren't standing still, we're going backwards, backwards to the 1970s where few people outside the islands knew about the Falklands and probably fewer cared.

He said the matter came down to the core issue of self determination. our desire to remain British which requires support from as wide an audience as possible and without that we have nothing."

He added, "I can only assume that anybody who believes that what are sometimes twelve hour days during

Councillor Cockwell commented. "I believe that from this visit we've got four new firm supporters who will be going in to bat for us if it's necessary in the wider fora of the world.

Councillor Cheek spoke of the important role of the Falkland Islands Government Office in London and in particular the FIG Representative, Sukey Cameron. She said, "Those of us who have any dealings with them know how hardworking and efficient they are and we greatly appreciate that. The work that Sukey herself does in keeping the profile of the islands high in lobbying and other activities, cannot be underestimated."

She said that at the annual party conferences it is "apparent" how much work Ms Cameron has done with members of parliament, "... to make sure that they are aware of all the issues that we have.'

Birmingham: openness limited in small communities

OPENNESS in government can only go "so far, Councillor Birmingham believes.

In his motion for adjournment speech, he commented, "... the problem with open government as I see it in such a small community is that, if you look back over the last few months, we have had situations where individuals have been going to committee meetings and picking up halfheard remarks and creating problems for committee members and on occasion, councillors. The affect of this has been that people do not speak as openly as they would do in the past."

He said openness can only go "so far in a small community. "I am afraid the reality is that sometimes we are dealing with very nice people, who perhaps aren't up to their job.

"It can be very difficult to discuss in an open committee the difficulties that particular individual is having with their job.'

Public must prepare for budget limitations

BUDGET proceedings for the next financial year have started and Councillor Summers has warned the public to adjust its expectations.

He told Legislative Council. "Heads of Departments will be aware there is a need to reduce recurrent expenditure again next year and hope members of the public are aware there is likely to be a need to reduce recurrent expenditure again next year. Therefore expectation will have to be adjusted.

He continued, "It is simply not possible to do everything that might be desirable within the funds that are available to us. This is not an apology in advance but simply an observation that things can't always necessarily be as they were."

He added, "There is a major opportunity for us in the preparation of next year's budget - to hike up the taxation on smoking to such an extent that we become very wealthy and/or everybody gives up.

She commented, "We would love to speak to Argentina about flights but they don't want to speak to us.

"They don't feel that they want to communicate with the Falkland Islands Government per se, they want to go through the British Government

Councillor Cheek expressed her appreciation to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, "...for the strong stand they are taking on our behalf and the careful way in which they are listening to our concerns on international issues."

Public voice imporant in Constitutional Review

COUNCILLORS Hansen and Summers have urged the public to get involved with the Constitutional Review.

In his motion for adjournment speech Mr Hansen commented, "I believe we need as much involvement as possible from the public on this issue: whether it is in the form of comment or criticism or questions, it doesn't matter, we need the feedback.

"I would urge as many people as possible to make some form of con-

Councillor Summers said councillors are coming to a "critical phase" in the development of the revised Constitution: "...the phase where members of the public need to engage with elected members on the proposed contents, the thoughts behind t, the ideas behind it and make sure that the general public is providing

support to that because if they're not, the issue will have to be set aside.' He said this council will not be

proposing to the Foreign Office and the Privy Council a Constitution that does not have the general support of the public.

Mr Summers said he and his colleagues intend that there should be public meetings and debate on the radio on the content of the proposals, "...so everyone can be aware of the content, feel comfortable with the content '

He added, "...if you're not comfortable, then there is a provision which I firmly believe we should use, to provide in our report to the Foreign Office and Privy Council minority reports on other views in the way that the Constitution should be formed.'

The dangers of being a 'second hand smoker'

THIS article is really aimed at the 70% of us who don't smoke Well... there's not that many of us because - courtesy of the smokers around us - an awful lot of us actu-

ally DO smoke.

We can't avoid it and so the number of true non-smokers is actually very small. Inspired by the recent Penguin News discussions and by action being taken across the world against passive smoking. it's time to review the evidence about passive smoking so that we know what we're dealing with.


Smokers often point out the benefits of smoking. They pay more tax - which offsets their higher healthcare costs. By exercising their right to smoke in public they are striking a blow for individual freedom against Government domination. As the nicotine in the smoke relaxes them and reduces their anxiety levels, they should also be calm, nice people to have around us. They might also point out the alleged link between smoking and the profits of licensed premises, so should we perhaps also thank them for keeping the pubs open for the rest of us to enjoy? Of course, the smell of stale ashtray on our clothes and hair after only a few minutes in any of our local hostelries is a constant reminder!

So - what of the harmful effects on non-smokers. Something to think about is that the smoke from a burning cigarette has double the concentration of nicotine and tar of that inhaled by the smoker because the health-conscious smoker usually inhales through a

filter!

Even smoke that has gone through a smoker's lungs, nose and throat is not good for us. Only 15% of the smoke from a cigarette stays inside the smoker - the other 85% is a free gift from the smoker, bringing to us all the benefits of being smokers almost without having to pay for it. Passive smokers only have to pay the health cost!

The two big killers of smokers are cancer and heart attacks so, as you'd expect, cancer and heart attacks are the two biggest risks for passive smokers as well. Heavy exposure to second-hand smoke (such as you get if you have a smoker in the household or you



work in a smoky atmosphere such as a pub or a work place where smoking is allowed) increases nonsmokers risk of lung cancer by at least 20% and increases the risk of cancers in the nose and the cervix. Heavy exposure to second-hand smoke also increases the risk of a heart attack by 91%. Even occasional exposure to used smoke increases the heart attack risk by

As a second-hand smoker you are also up to 80% more likely to have a stroke and you run a higher risk of blood clots in your veins which can cause problems such as Deep Vein Thrombosis (DVT). There is also evidence of increased risks of low-weight babies, miscarriages and stillbirths for mothers who inhale used smoke.

Children inhaling second-hand smoke double their chances of getting chest illnesses such as pneumonia and bronchitis, and makes them more likely to get ear infections, 'glue ear', tonsillitis, wheezing and asthma. If a child has asthma then used smoke increases the number and seriousness of asthma attacks. Research into Cot Death has also suggested that passive smoking may be one of the contributory factors.

So - what is it that makes used smoke so dangerous for us? The answer is tar - and over 4,000 different chemicals, at least 60 of which are known to cause cancer (some of the more familiar ones are arsenic, benzene, chromium, nickel. cadmium and formaldehyde). Nicotine causes addiction. It also increases heart rate and blood pressure, and is what reduces anxiety in the smoker. In addition, the poisonous gas carbon monoxide is found in tobacco smoke.

There is, of course, also the cash impact of smoking. If you have a 20-a-day smoker in the family, that's taking about £1200 a year out of the family budget - enough to pay for one return flight to the UK, or about 3 return flights to Chile. Two or more 20-a-day smokers in the family and you're talking big money, especially if the family is on low wages.

So – if you are a passive smoker, what can you do about it? If you're a baby - there's nothing you can do unless your parents help you. If you're a child you may have to rely on adults to help you. If you are an adult, there are really only two things you can do

Firstly, stop smoke being created near you. That's tricky because it always involves getting somebody else to do something to help - either by giving up smoking altogether, or only smoking somewhere you aren't. There is lots of help from the Health Service for those who want to give up, so you can help by encouraging and supporting those who want to give up. Nearly all smokers say that they want to give up! Employers can follows FIG's example and make all workplaces non-smoking, so you can help by encouraging and supporting your employer to do just that.

The second thing you can do avoiding inhaling used smoke - is also not easy. One feature of used smoke, though, is that it follows the airflow so stay upwind of smokers. Stay near open doors and windows so that the draught carries the smoke away from you. Don't stay in smoky atmospheres. If there is air extraction, get it switched on - it's no good if it's not being used. You can also help by encouraging smokers to smoke only where they will not affect other people.

Or - finally - you could always buy a gas mask!

'The Bushman' turns weatherman

I HAVE always been interested in the ability of those living on the land to predict weather patterns. You know the kind of thing - if cows lie down in a field it is going to rain or if sea birds are in land then storms are brewing at sea.

I had the opportunity of spend-ing some time with some 'native Americans' the Pez Nez tribe to you and me, on their reservation in Montana and the conversation got round to cloud formations.

I was explaining that the big dark fluffy ones, the ones resembling 'head of big buffalo running from pale face hunters' were in fact Cumulus Nimbus and foretold bad weather. At this Chief Tonincheek fell about laughing and produced three sticks about a foot high (native Americans stick to the old ways and don't like change) tying them at the top to form a tripod and hung a small pebble from the apex on a length of thin simulated buffalo

Wool report - week ending November 26 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices in South Africa, Australia and New Zealand decreased significantly at sales last week

It is unfortunate that the falls recorded last week erased the gains achieved over the last few weeks of selling for most micron categories and went even further at the broader end of the micron spec-

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide", prices falls were greatest at the fine end of the market.

As an example, falls of up to 14 pence per kilogram clean were recorded for 19 micron fleece wool lots while for mid-micron lots, falls were in the order of 7 to 10 pence per kilogram clean.

Severe currency pressure (\$US to rest of major wool selling nations) is regarded as a significant contributor to the market fall.

In New Zealand last week there was an 89% clearance of the 10,195 bales on offer while in Australia 84% of the 59,165 bales offered for sale were sold

Included in the Australian offering were 6,308 bales of crossbred wool of which 93% were sold.

*Exchange rates prevailing at time of publication used to convert wool prices into pence per kg clean basis (AUS \$2.38/£)

*Information derived from AWEX market report and Wool Record Weekly.

*Values based on average auction floor prices from Australian Eastern markets.

Live fire accident in naval exercise

AN Argentine warship inadvertently fired on a Brazilian frigate during joint naval exercises in the Atlantic injuring five people, none seriously.

Four Brazilian sailors and an Argentine officer, acting as observer. were hurt with metal shrapnel during live fire training on Monday night off the coast of Brazil near Cabo Frio

Brazilian and Argentine naval units were engaged in the annual Operation Fraterno which have been ongoing since 1987

The Argentine vessel Sarandi allegedly fired the round that hit the Brazilian vessel Rademaker.

A joint release from both Navies. 24 hours after the incident didn't reveal many details but basically said the exercise began last Saturday and the theatre covers an area extending from Itajai in the southern state of Santa Catarina to Cabo Frio, Rio do Janeiro.

The Argentine Navy was involved with destroyer Sarandi, corvette Spiro and the Santa Cruz submariné; on the Brazilian side, the frigates Rademaker and Defensora and the Tapajo submarine.

As well as the naval inquiry into the incident, Brazil's federal Justice also opened an inquest.

According to Brazilian press reports the live ordnance did not actually explode and damage to the vessel was light.

Parking for aircraft in Chilean Antarctic base

THE building of a parking ground with capacity for two Hercules C130 and the improvement of the 1.292 meter long landing strip in the Antarctic base of Teniente Marsh on King George Island will be completed this season according to the Punta Arenas press.

The project is financed by the Magallanes Development Fund and will be undertaken by the Chilean Military Task Force with support from the three services.

Heavy equipment and materials will be arriving on the Chilean Navy

icebreaker Almirante Viel with the support of the high seas tug Lautaro.

The Army engineers will be responsible for the 126 x 126 metre parking lot which will need land removal and gravel stumping and for improving the drainage of the air strip and mounting a more sophisticated landing illumination and control system

Depending on weather conditions the project, including the infrastructure for the parking lot, is expected to be finalised by the end of February or early March 2005.



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

Berthing policy follows tanker's grounding

A POLICY has been drafted which will define the parameters for the denial of permission to berth at Stanley's port following the grounding of the tanker *Centaurus* (right) in the capital's harbour.

Councillor Richard Cockwell, responding to a question from his colleague Mike Summers, said the policy is being distributed to shipping companies, agents and interested parties for comment. "As soon as this Berthing Policy is agreed it will be made available to the public. It is intended that this will be within the next month."

The issue of what written instructions are in place for the provision or denial of permission to pass through the harbour's entrance, better known as the Narrows, and/or dock at the Falklands Interim Port and Storage System (FIPASS) during adverse weather conditions was raised following Centaurus' grounding on November 23.

The vessel is an elderly prod-



uct tanker with a single fixed pitch propeller and on turning in Stanley Harbour, despite having her starboard anchor deployed, was unable to turn up into the wind.

The Ports and Harbours Information Brochure, which is published annually and distributed to all ship masters and yachtsmen, contains instructions on harbour safety and reporting. It does not however deal specifically with provision or denial of permission to pass through the Narrows or dock at FIPASS.

Councillor Cockwell reported, "The FIPASS Manager and Marine Officer have powers under the provisions of the FIPASS Ordinance 1989 to regulate shipping within FIPASS waters, which are defined as those waters within one nautical mile from FIPASS.

"The Marine Officer also has certain powers within the harbours under the provisions of the Harbour Ordinance, though these are barely adequate in view of the fact that the principal Harbour Ordinance was drafted in 1902. Requirements for harbour reporting are contained in the fisheries legislation, so strictly speaking they only apply to reefers and fishing vessels."

He added, "It is not wholly clear under the Ordinance as to whom the power to control berthing and unberthing is delegated to. It is intended to clarify this issue in a proposed new berthing policy."

Councillor Cockwell also confirmed that the master and pilot concerned in the *Centaurus* incident have been interviewed and a report will be issued shortly.

FOGL's area grows

THE government has awarded Falkland Oil and Gas Limited (FOGL) an offshore production licence for an additional 50,000 square kilometers.

The licence area is adjacent to its existing licences where FOGL is in a joint venture with Hardman Resources.

FOGL now has an interest in a total of 83,000 sq km. Geophysical Services Incorporated has been contracted to undertake a 2D seismic survey on FOGL's joint venture acreage and that survey will now be extended to include the new area.

It is expected that the seismic survey over both the new and the joint venture areas will amount to over 10,000km of 2D seismic lines.

John Armstrong, Executive Chairman of FOGL, said: "We are very pleased to have secured the offshore production licence for this additional acreage, which is intended to provide the company with opportunities to the North East of and on trend with the leads in the company's Hardman joint venture area.

"FOGL now has licences covering a vast area and has by far the largest acreage of any company operating in the region."

Sex case: not guilty pleas

A MAN who is alleged to have sexually assaulted a child has entered pleas to the three charges against him.

In court yesterday, Robert William Smith pleaded not guilty to assault of a child under 13 by penetration, assault occasioning actual bodily harm and intentionally touching a child in a sexual nature.

The case has been adjourned for two weeks, until Thursday, December 23.

Mr Smith remains subject to strict bail conditions.

Three cruisers this week

THE cruise ship Europa is in Stanley today, carrying 202 passengers.

Tomorrow it is the turn of Explorer II, carrying 208 passengers.

On Wednesday, Clipper Adventurer will visit Carcass Island and New Island. She will have approximately 100 passengers on board.

I HAD to refrain from headbutting a wall in frustration earlier this week after speaking to a chap from a visiting cruise ship who popped his head into the office

He had noticed a 'Keep Gibraltar British' sticker in our window and queried "why on earth" such a sticker would be in the Falklands.

I dutifully explained that Falkland Islanders feel an affinity with Gibraltarians, who although staunchly British by choice, have their sovereignty claimed by a pushy and often oppressive neighbour.

He seemed quite bamboozled by this and had no idea that we still had 'issues' with Argentina. Looking slightly bemused, he wished us luck and

shuffled out of the office.

Last month councillors once again defended their trips overseas, arguing the importance of raising the Falklands' profile to other nations. me, my short exchange with Mr Tourist illustrated exactly why we need to keep funding these trips abroad.

The Falklands, its attributes and its problems remain unheard of in some corners of the world.

International indifference towards us is very dangerous - we need to be proactive in making friends.

Sitting at home and quietly hoping for the best won't get us anywhere.

MORE encouragingly, it seems our very own youngsters have been making quite an effort at improving international relations.

We received a letter this week from Australians Sue and Gordon Chatterton who attended the Commonwealth Youth Games in Bendigo, so impressed had they been by the Falklands team and their supporters they took the time to write and say so.

They described Dion, Roxane, Edward and Hannah as "fantastic" and "It was a pleasure to get to know them during their stay and an even bigger pleasure being adopted supporters and waving the flag.

Locally we often hear people bemoan Falklands' participation in sporting events overseas. that it's a waste of money and - apart from shooting events - we never stand a chance at medals.

This letter from Australia highlights in its own small way the benefits of getting Falkland Islanders out to mix with the rest of the world.

I think we can safely assume Mr and Mrs Chatterton will now serve as ambassadors for the Falklands in Australia.

Youth Games athletes return tomorrow

THE Falklands team returns home tomorrow from the Commonwealth Youth Games in Bendigo, Australia.

Their final day of competition was held last Friday, Edward Freer, Dion Robertson and Hannah Arthur-Almond all competed on the

Dion raced in two events, completing the 100m Breastroke in 1:42.26 from a previous best of 1:46.61. He also finished well in the 50m Freestyle race shaving three seconds off his personal best, finishing in 35.11 seconds from a previous best of 38.87.

Hannah Arthur-Almond competed in her only event for the meet and, despite being plagued with glandular fever, managed to take one second off her personal best in the 50m Freestyle event.

Edward Freer competed in what appeared to be one race too many. He started well in the pool, finishing the 100m Breastroke three seconds faster than his personal best. He again was able to slash his personal best in the 50m Freestyle by completing in 32.61, a second faster than his previous best of 33.03 seconds

However he was outclassed in the 200m Individual Medley and appeared fatigued at the end of the race. His time was ten seconds slower than he had previously swum and he finished in 3:11.53.

Team Manager Steve Dent com-mented, "The swimming team gained support from many interna-tional coaches at the event who were pleased to see such a small country competing and Swim Manager Parn Freer has made some very valuable contacts through the meet."

So concludes the Falklands participation in the Eleventh Commonwealth Youth Games. Steve said, "There's no silverware to bring home but a fantastic run of smashed personal bests and very happy

young athletes."

He added, "I am delighted with
the way these young people have managed to sell themselves and their country to the rest of the Commonwealth.

"They are amongst the most well known in the village and many team managers have commented on their excellent behaviour and team spirit.

"I am very proud of all of their fantastic achievements often against insurmountable odds. Yet again another victory for the Falklands in international sporting events.

The team returns to the Islands tomorrow after some much needed rest in Melbourne.

Cautious approval for Bio-Security report

A REPORT on the security of the Islands against invasion by diseases. foreign pests and environmentally hostile species of plant life will be passed to Executive Council for information, pending further discussion by the Agricultural Advisory Committee.

The Committee met on Tuesday to discuss the first draft of the report on importation and quarantine procedures produced by consultants. John Hellstrom and Bruce Simpson of New Zealand-based Bio Security Ltd, who visited the Islands in early October.

At 62 pages the first draft of their report was a meaty document, which covered twenty-two possible "pathways" by which exotic pests and diseases or invasive species could enter the Islands and offered 96 recommendations designed to prevent this happening. Opening the discussion, Chairman of the Committee, Councillor Mike Summers, made the point that there was a need to prioritise the consultants' recommendations in order to be able to begin to assess how they might be implemented.

Senior Veterinary Officer, Steve Pointing said that he had already been in contact with the consultants. who realised that the form of the original draft had made it difficult to work with and consequently had sent a second draft. In this revised version, which he had just received and had not yet had time to read, the number of recommendations had been reduced to twenty, which appeared to be grouped in a logical sequence. He was sure that in its present form, the second draft would prove a much more user-friendly document.

Asked by the Chairman if there were any concerns raised by the report which seemed to merit immediate action, Mr Pointing said that there didn't appear to be any new risks mentioned, but that he would be keen to implement recommendations regarding present unnecessary bureaucracy as soon as possible. He cited the present need to have certification for the importation of heat-treated milk from Chile as an example of this.

A major recommendation of the consultants' report is that the govemment should create the new post of Bio-security Officer, who, it is envisaged, would have background training in biology and be given appropriate regulatory powers.

This suggestion was received cautiously by the Committee. Councillor Richard Cockwell appeared to speak for other members when he cautioned against government. "...building another layer of bureaucracy.

In view of the fact that members had not yet seen the new draft, the chairman decided that further detailed discussion should be deferred until early in the new year, by which time the report should also have been circulated amongst others likely to be affected by its recommendations and to be able to assess their practicality. In the meantime, the new draft of the consultants' report would be passed, for information only, to Executive Council.

Also discussed by the Agricultural Advisory Committee was a plan designed to make a significant im-

pact on both wool fibre and meat production from Falklands sheep.

The Sheep Improvement Project (SIP), which will now start on April 16, 2005, involves using the best ewe genetics available in the Falklands in combination with "farm choice" frozen semen from, primarily, New Zealand and Australia, with the aim of generating in excess of 2500 elite rams and ewes for Falkland Island farms in 2005.

Rams generated from the project in 2005 would be used in 2007 to mate with ewes from privately owned farms to produce commercial lambs with significantly enhanced wool and meat characteristics. It is possible that some ram hoggets could be used in 2006, however this would depend on them being mature enough for use.

Ewes generated from the project would become the future ram-breeding nucleus for the Islands.

The Polwarth ewes of the National Stud Flock are likely to provide the bulk of the ewe genetics used in the 2005 programme, with the best 160 ewes in total (approximately 20 ewes from each of the eight stud families) being selected and made available for fresh embryo collection

It is proposed that the estimated 400/450 ewes remaining in the National Stud Flock should be exchanged, for a period of 12 months. for 2.400 ewes belonging to adjoining farms belonging to Falklands Landholdings Corporation. Two thousand of the Falklands Landholdings ewes will be used as recipient ewes for embryos from the Department of Agriculture

Post implantation the National Stud Flock stud ram team will be used as "chaser" rams over all recipient ewes. Ewes marked by the rams will be returned to Falkland Landholdings at the earliest opportunity and Falkland Landholdings ewes that lamb at the Agricultural Department's farm at Saladero will be exchanged for the National Stud Flock ewes after weaning in early 2006.

Introducing the scheme, which he said had the ability to massively speed up the rate of progress of farm breeding plans, Senior Agricultural Advisor, Neil Judd, said that it was all about producing enough elite animals to make an impact on wool fibre and on meat production. The aim was to get as many generaled as possible. For this reason, he was anxious that while the costs of the programme should be covered by the charges levied on participating farmers, there should be no charge made for the use of the governmentowned, Polwarth and Corriedale ewe genetics.

While approving the implementation of the Sheep Improvement Plan, some Committee members felt that there should be a token charge for the use of National Stud Flock embryos to avoid seriously undercutting those private farms who might also be involved in embryo production.

In the end, as a compromise, it was agreed that a charge of £5 per embryo would be made in addition to the cost of participating in the programme.

November 2004: a dry and sunny month

NOVEMBER proved to be drier and sunnier than average, according to the Meteorological Office at Mount Pleasant.

The month showed a fair amount of variety, fine weather at the start with reasonable temperatures contrasted with cold weather at times in the second half and a period of strong north west winds with rotor effects common in the middle of the month.

High pressure brought fine weather initially and temperatures up to 16.4C on the 6th and the period to the 14th had generally above average temperatures. The mean maximum for the month was 13.2C against the average of 13.0C. the lowest maximum was 6.7C on the

The highest temperature was 18.2C on the 29th. The mean minimum was 4.7C against an average of 4.1C. The lowest minimum was 0.7C on the 2nd. There were no nights of air frost and six nights of ground frost.

Rainfall was below average by about 22.2mm, at 12.2mm, the driest at Mount Pleasant since records began in 1986.

The highest daily total was 2.6 on the 26th. There were 12 days of 0.1mm or more, and five days of 1.0mm or more. There was no snow recorded during the month.

Sunshine was slightly above average at 222.8 hours, against the 212.8 hours average. The sunniest day was 15.1 hours on the 22nd.

Most of the strong winds and gales were in the second half. There were five days of gales altogether.

The mean wind speed was 15.3 knots, the long term average being 16.2 knots. The highest gust recorded was 57 knots on the 27th. Gusts exceeded 33 knots on 16 days, against an average of 18.6.

Eighteen month probation for Stanley man

FOLLOWING his guilty pleas to two charges of criminal damage and one of assault, a Stanley man now faces eighteen months of probation.

Robert William Stewart made his third appearance in court on Thursday for sentencing following an adjournment from November 17 for the preparation of a pre-sentence report by the Probation Team Leader.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said Mr Stewart had experienced a considerable chain of events recently which the report made evident had culminated in him reaching "crisis point."

Mrs Faulds said the 18 month probation order would apply to all three charges and that it would provide the opportunity to improve the conditions Mr Stewart was facing at present, saying he was more, need of support than anything at the moment.

The prosecution was awarded £70

The Falklands Factor does exist

WHY do things cost so much to buy or get done in the Falkland Islands? This "Falklands Factor" has been

the subject of a two-part study spon-sored by the Policy Unit at the Sec-retariat and undertaken by Gina Smith from the Treasury

First, the costs of building a house in the Falklands were compared to those of building a house in Scotland. A government spokesperson said the comparison suggested that per square metre, "...it is 60% more expensive to build a single storey, 3 bedroom, timber-framed house in the Falklands than in Scotland.

This is despite the fact that the land is prepared to a much higher standard in the Falklands than in Scotland."

The second part of the study was 'perceptions survey' to find out whether or not people consider that the Falklands Factor exists and attempt to find out the reasons behind Representatives from the private sector and government employees were asked to take part in inter-

The survey showed that people believe that there is a Falklands Factor. The spokesperson explained, A few respondents tended to think that it is an inevitable consequence of the site and geographical location of the Falklands.

"Members of the private sector were more concerned about its negative economic effects and were interested in trying to find ways to

address the problem.

According to the government spokesperson, most people interview thought he Falklands Factor is largely due to the scarcity of semi-skilled labour in the Islands, "...which skilled labour in the Islands, results in the high demand for, and consequently high cost of labour on the Islands, and the added travel and accommodation costs of employing

semi-skilled labour from overseas." She continued, "The house-building comparative costs reflect this, as cost categories that are labour intensive, such as electrical and plumbing installation and painting and decorating, are between three and four times higher in the Falkland Islands than in Scotland.

"Respondents also suggested that high FIG pay rates, the paying of unskilled labour at skilled labour rates, and the scarcity of labour in the Falklands in general, result in high labour costs across the board, and greatly contribute to the higher cost of goods and services in the Falklands."

Solving the shortage of skilled and semi-skilled labour here was seen as difficult by those interviewed. The spokesperson said, "People suggested that local training facilities are limited, many people are poorly

placed to undertake training overseas, and also that it is difficult to send people overseas for training as this would worsen the shortage of labour here.

"It was suggested that importing more semi-skilled labour from overseas would help to reduce the problem of high labour costs in the Falk-

The high direct and indirect costs associated with importing goods are another contributing factor. The government spokesperson commented, "The Islands' distance from the UK plays a major part in inflating the direct costs of importation. but there are also the indirect costs due to delays in projects when goods do not arrive in the Islands, or when they become scarce locally.
"Respondents suggested that al-

though they can source goods inex-pensively overseas, the freight costs increase the final cost of the project or the cost to the consumer.

"The house cost comparison shows that structural items cost 46% more in the Falklands than in Scotland and internal furnishings 36% more. It was suggested that a more frequent, reliable shipping service might reduce the direct and indirect costs associated with importing goods to the Islands."

The absence of a wholesalers also appears to contribute to the Falklands Factor with respondents commenting that rather than purchase goods locally they prefer to source them from overseas themselves. The spokesperson said, "However, sometimes they must purchase products locally which they say is time-consuming and more expensive than if they obtain the goods overseas them-

selves.
"This appears to create a 'catch 22' situation where suppliers do not carry a comprehensive range/stock of larger capital items, and due to a lack of competition may charge higher prices, and major buyers purchase overseas because of the limited range, stock and higher prices in the Islands. If more people were buying locally this would reduce the need for local suppliers to place such a high mark up on goods.

The spokesperson added, "There is no quick fix to the Falklands Factor but increased awareness of its causes can help groups such as the Chamber of Commerce and the government work to minimise its effects on the economy."

Approvals and refusals at Planning meeting

SEVENTEEN applications for planning permission have been considered by the latest meeting of the Planning and Building Committee.
At the meeting held on Decem-

ber 2, three applications, deferred at earlier meetings, were first to be reviewed with one given a decision the disposal site for "OVS and MHI inspected low health risk surplus abattoir waste" proposed by the Falk-land Islands Meat Company on a beach south of the Sand Bay Abattoir. Members heard from the Environmental Planning Officer (EPO), following her visit to the site and resolved to refuse planning per-mission. Other options are to be considered for such disposal and a new application is expected shortly.

The first of new applications vas the submission by Iain Berntsen of detailed plans for the construction of a ramp on to the beach at the Canache, with siting of two upgraded containers for storage and improvements to the access road. Permission in principle for the development had been granted at an earlier meeting and members were satisfied with the further details now submitted, therefore resolving to grant conditional planning permis-

Such permission was also granted a number of other development proposals: the erection of a solid panel re-positioning of the driveway and re-positioning of a power pole at 2 Dean Street for Dawn Hoy; a double domestic garage at 6 Goss Road for Kevin and Teena Ormond; Richard Fogerty's extension to his dwelling at Stone Cottage on Stanley By-Pass; dormer windows installation at 6 Moody Street for Stanley Electrical Limited (although further details are needed before a Building Permit can be issued for these works), the raising of the height of the present cairn by eighteen inches, with the construction of a stone retaining wall with flowerbed around the seat dedicated to the late Harold Rowlands at "B" Slip on Ross Road East submitted by 460 Port Troop; a dwelling at 11 Biggs Road for Miss A Tomlinson: works at Malvina House Hotel involving the siting of a refrigeration unit and relocation of the kitchen external door for Stanley Services Limited; Alistair Wilkinson's proposal to replace an existing fence on the south and west boundaries of his property at 5 Felton Court with a 1.8 metre-high fence; a conservatory at 36 Davis Street for Paul Howe; and the erection and display of twelve directional signs pointing in the direction of Cartmell Cottage and sited in various locations around Stanley for the Falkland Islands Museum and National Trust.

An application to drill holes at a number of different sites on East Falkland submitted by Falklands Gold and Mineral Limited was favourably viewed by members and is to be put to Executive Council for decision as required by The Planning Ordinance.

Minor works to an outbuilding at 6A Pioneer Row submitted by Miss Myra Pitt were declared by the EPO to be "permitted development" and, with a Building Permit having been approved, this can now proceed with-

out further delay.

The Building Advisor then re-ported on those thirteen applications for a Building Permit and was pleased to advise members that seven were satisfactory. One application was withdrawn and he was pursuing the matter with the remaining five, being hopeful of early resolution of the outstanding items which were de-

laying approval.

The committee then moved on to the two last items on the agenda. The first of these was a request from Robin Fryatt for an extension to the temporary planning permission granted at the July 2004 meeting, which was for the siting of a storestudio container at the FIDF HQ on Kiel Canal Road. Members duly noted Mr Fryatt's circumstances which had led to his absence from the Islands for a little over three months and agreed to grant a further four months consent, but warned this was unlikely to be renewed.

A petition, signed by some fiftyseven Islanders and voicing concern over the direction of the road crossing on the Murrell River to provide access to the Murrell Farm, was then looked at and it was agreed that, as it was impossible to withdraw a planning permission once issued, the matter would be referred to councillors for any necessary action.

Councillor Edwards asked the

Building Advisor about two specific incidents that had arisen where builders had failed to give due notification at certain stages of building work. These related to a large double garage and a new dwelling. The Building Advisor said he had managed to resolve some of the issues but was awaiting a statement on one of the items

He then advised the Committee of various other developments including those where builders had not given notice as required by the Building Regulations 1999, and said he had contacted the persons involved and would be reporting further at the next meeting. Members agreed that these omissions were a serious matter which could lead to legal action being taken.

The next meeting of the Planning and Building Committee will be held on Thursday, January 13, 2005.

Royal Navy says hello to Ellen MacArthur

Yachtswoman MacArthur had some unexpected company as she headed southwards in mid-Atlantic in her bid to make the fastest time for a single-handed round-the-world voyage.

Just two degrees north of the Equator she met up with Royal Navy frigate HMS Iron Duke and Royal Fleet Auxiliary tanker RFA Gold

Rover. The two ships were heading northwards from Brazil; they had been carefully monitoring Ellen's progress since she left France and have also been updating her website with weather reports.

The Commander of Iron Duke enjoyed a conversation with Ellen during which she sounded in high spirits, full of good morale and almost overwhelmed by "the unique experience" of two warships escorting her south with a helicopter in the air

circling the convoy.

Battle of the Falklands commemorated - 90 years on

December 8 is Battle Day, the occasion which commemorates the defeat of the German East Asiatic Squadron commanded by Vice Admiral Maximilliam Von Spee in 1914.

As is often the case, the sun shone on this year's Act of Remembrance at the Battle Monument on Ross Road East which followed a memorial service in Christ Church Cathedral. Constitutional Review: self-determination or stagnation?

IN REPLY to the suggestion from councillors and others that people might like to comment on the progress so far of the Constitutional review I have considered whether I should do this as a long time nonresident of the Falklands, although I am a Falkland Islander.

In considering making a response I take into account that I have no wish or desire to interfere in the internal affairs of the Falklands but feel in this instance that as the Falklands Constitution ultimately defines its status in the world and therefore its relationship and role in international affairs; the impact of the im-plementation of any review on the standing and interests of the United Kingdom in its relationship with the rest of the world and in particular Argentina and the remainder of the Latin American countries; then as a UK taxpayer and voter I feel qualified to make comment. This is regardless of my personal connections with the Falklands.

My initial reading of the review gives me the impression that it is so far a disappointing and fairly unimaginative attempt to fulfill, or even sidestep, the suggested reforms out-lined in the 1997 White Paper which said among the principles to be sought and followed (briefly summarized):

The partnership must be founded on self-determination

But Overseas Territories are British for as long as they wish to remain British.

Britain will grant independence where it is requested and is an op-

Most Overseas Territories want the constitutional link to continue

Britain remains committed to those territories which choose to retain the British connection

The basis of those principles are outlined as follows:-

The governance of the territories must have a firm base. Democracy, human rights and the rule of law are all as relevant in the Overseas Territories as elsewhere.

The principles which should underlie modern constitutions are clear.

There must be a balance of obligations and expectations, and both should be clearly and explicitly set

Future action will focus on: improvements to the composition of legislatures and their operation;

improving the effectiveness, effi-ciency, accountability and impar-tiality of the public service; the role of Overseas Territory Min-

isters and Executive Councils and their exercise of collective responsibility for government policy and de-

respect for the rule of law and the constitution.

the promotion of representative and participative government; freedom of speech and informa-

the provision of high standards of justice

adoption of modern standards of respect for human rights." Looking at the role of Execu-tive Council and the exercise of collective responsibility I would have to disagree with Councillor Mike Summers, whose interview on the Constitutional review was published on FINN recently.

In saying that the Government of the Falklands is conducted by an unwieldy consensus, in which nobody takes individual responsibility he then proposes greater consensus suggesting extended responsibility to all councillors collectively. Then it is suggested there is also no need for an opposition group. This is the first step down the road to step down the road to authoritarianism even if it is exercised by 'collective consensus.

To imply that an opposition is a 'waste of resources' again is an inherently dangerous and undemocratic view to express. He also quoted 'I heard a number of small territories complain that having an opposition is frankly a waste of people's time. So, we've avoided that.' This is an outrageous and totally undemocratic position to support. A loyal opposition provides balance to a democratic and accountable Government and contributes a great deal simply by keeping Government on its toes by preventing complacency and self-interest developing

The way to provide this balance in the Falklands would be to increase the number of councillors to represent a better and balanced range of opinion. After all the Falklands is well known for its public meetings to test opinion and hear criticism, what better way then to extend this consultation than to elect a broader representation formally.

The flaw in the councillors' opin-

ions is just this: Constitutions may well provide for the structure of Government but they cannot deter-mine by dictate that a country should be governed by consensus. Elected representatives must and will themselves decide whether or not to support their elected colleagues who assume or are elected to executive Government this cannot be something pre-ordained by a constitution.
With regard to the introduction

of a ministerial system this is by far the best way to ensure the taking of responsibility, even on a small scale. Here in the UK there has been a major movement towards this system in Local Government by the implementation of the Cabinet system where Executive Members (Councillors elected by their peers) take responsibility in the 'Cabinet' (Executive Council) for their individual portfolios. This is done on a part time basis, though legitimate expenses are paid. The 'Chair' or 'Executive Member' of each distinct department, along with his committee, oversees the permanent Chief Officer (Employee) who runs the relevant department on a day-to-day basis and ensures that (Council) policy is implemented according to the instructions given. There is clearly no reason why this system should not be adopted in the Falklands modified to meet local needs.

On the other hand the establishment of a public accounts committee would be an advance or perhaps even better an Independent Audit Commission with appropriate powers of investigation would be an even better suggestion.

Perhaps some attention could be given to a Falklands 'nationality' and probably advantageous generational rights to people who may wish to return or orignate from the Falklands diaspora and contribute to or invest in the Falklands economy (not for myself unfortunately) but are reluctant to do so because of the present immigration constraints and employment rules.

The Governor as head of the Public Service is one thing but significant movement towards total self-government must exclude him from the day to day running of the Public Services. He has after all over riding powers that provide sufficient authority to protect the interests of the United Kingdom in any Falk-

Again the provision of an Ombudsman to protect individuals would be welcome but whether this has anything to do with a Constitutional review is another matter and like the matter of dealing with mentally ill persons seems simply to be a matter of a diversionary red herring that could be dealt with as a matter of law and as a Human Rights issues. After all the United Kingdom does not have a written Constitution at all and relies on a combination of common law, tradition and precedent and latterly European legislation to inform its rights, obligations and du-ties. These things must also be supplementary to any constitution in the Falklands

There is much more that could be said about freedom of speech, information a high standard of justice and human rights but enough has been said to be going on with to stimulate debate as my concern is particularly the external message that is being sent abroad not only to Argentina but also to the International community in general and genuine supporters such as myself.

The basis of a free future for the Falkands is undoubtedly the progress of self-determination. The following of a clear path to self-determination is a message that must be sent abroad as a loud and clear one. The present message, via the Constitu-tional Review, is a weak and vacillating one that will convince nobody of the intention to pursue the aim of a strong, democratic and eventually independent Falklands strongly associated with the United Kingdom. The present stalemate of the status quo as a 'Colony' is surely not an acceptable position either to the UK or the United Nations but is one to the eternal liking of Argentina which country will soon enough exploit a 'do nothing' Falklands neo colonial culture.

The Falklands has strong and wide international support for self determination, but it also has near and determined enemies, if that support is to continue it needs to take the first steps that will ensure the Islands and Islanders themselves recognise the need to progress vigorously even if with some caution in the positive direction of full self-

If I remember correctly the problem then revolved around four simple words.

Most Bills, I gather, read "... the

Governor, in conjunction with Council, will..." but on that occasion the wording was subtly changed to "... the Governor will.

This would have given the Gov-ernor power to make decisions on oil related matters without reference to elected councillors

Fortunately, as on this occasion, Councillors were not hoodwinked and spotted the attempt to control a potentially huge source of income.

Its good to know that the FCO have the interests of the Islands and residents at heart.

Shirley says drawing was for pleasure at that time and her career was in nursing, not art.



Recognising the contribution of Commonwealth youth

ISLANDERS Donna Triggs and Justine Goss represented the Falklands at Commonwealth Day in March.

They were invited to attend a follow up seminar in the UK last

Here is Donna's account of the event.

AS A follow up to the Commonwealth Day Programme the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) invited representatives to a seminar. which took place on November 3. It was a smaller group of eight representatives for British Virgin Islands Cayman Islands, Jersey, Manitoba, New South Wales, St Helena and Trinidad and Tobago. Three Hansard Society Interns also joined us at this programme.

At this follow up seminar there was more discussion between the young participants, due to the group being smaller, with more questions raised and answered fully by visitors who kindly fitted the seminar into their busy schedule.

Susanna Darch, the public affairs assistant, joined us for our first discussion of the day. The topic was Royal Commonwealth Society: Involving Young People.

Here we learned that the RCS is the oldest Commonwealth society organisation. Their mission is to promote awareness and issues of the Commonwealth. They have many projects, mainly run in the United Kingdom. but participate across the Commonwealth. These projects include Vision Awards (short films produced by a range of young and old people, directors and producers across the Commonwealth) and Art Exhibitions which recently included a fashion show at the end of the London Fashion Show.

The RCS is also responsible for organising the Commonwealth Day Observance in Westminster Abbey. They hold international meetings every other year, which 60 branches attend.

The RCS is now looking towards the youth of the Commonwealth.

Youth or young people is such a varied term, how can we decide how old young people are? In the RCS they look towards people who are under the age of 29 being classed as a young person, though there are some examples of people being 40 and in their job being classed as a young person because of their achievement and progress

The RCS are looking towards young people becoming involved with the Society; as the year's progress members are becoming 'old' and 'out of

to a certain level at such a young age.

date' - and it is sometimes described as a 'decaying organisation'. The need for new fresh ideas and percentions are welcomed as it may bring new energy back into the organisation.

To ensure that the RCS's missions are effective they have looked at the help and involvement of young people. With this, young people are able to express their ideas and views and are enable to 'get involved' at high places; it offers the chance to incorporate this with the mainstreaming ideas and policing keeping discussions continued and new ideas flowing.

With this, youth councils may be beneficial as 50% of the Commonwealth population is under the age of 25, and this would give them more of an opportunity to become involved with current and future issues and able to promote projects towards improving services and politics.

Our second presentation was on the Commonwealth Human Rights Initiative, presented by Ellen Pugh.

The Human Rights Initiative was set up in 1980 because it was felt that human rights issues were not focused on enough. It is an international nongovernmental organisation.

If a jurisdiction has not complied with the Harare Commonwealth Declaration (mandate policy and discussion making involvement), they can become suspended from the Commonwealth and strong action can be taken against the state

Rather than becoming isolated and forgotten, the Commonwealth then pays more attention to the state involved to help sort out issues, to monitor and promote human rights and give advice to the leaders.

Matthew Neuhaus, the Director of Political Affairs Division of the Commonwealth Secretariat gave the third presentation of the day. He talked about the two aims of the Commonwealth - democracy and development - and how the modern Commonwealth came about, a 'free association'.

He said there is a need for developing countries - and potential for developed countries - to strengthen democ-

For our last discussion Kate Lawrence discussed her role in parliament as private secretary to the clerk of the parliaments. She explained how voting for new policies works and her input to debates.

After the follow-up seminar I spoke to Meenakshi Dhar, an organiser of the CPA Commonwealth Day and Follow-Up Seminar Programmes.

The Commonwealth network is so wide, not just geographically speak-

THE Falklands Conservation Watch Group have just spent an eventful weekend at Port Stephens.

Seventeen children and five adults travelled out on an extremely windy Saturday, Amanda and Julian Morris and I accompanied the children and we were also joined by Nick Hutton and David Proctor of Standard Chartered Bank.

The plan was to carry out a simulated whale rescue using the pontoons and water-filled whale that we have at Falklands Conservation. This training equipment is excellent in that it gives people doing the Marine Mammal Medic course a very realistic and hands on experience in how to refloat stranded marine mammals.

We arrived at Port Stephens on three planes throughout the morning and were all there by 11am.

After setting up tents and sorting out a bit of lunch the children were divided into four teams; each team was given an egg to look after. They were told that the egg was a rockhopper chick and that for the duration of the weekend they would have to protect this chick from predators and work out a way to safely return the chicks to the rockhopper colony.

Each team was given an envelope containing card, string, padding, foil and ribbon and the teams had to build their chick a vessel in which they could be launched back to their colony - the egg had to survive the launch and landing.

Throughout the afternoon the children had to fend off predators in the shape of myself, Amanda, Julian, Mr Hutton and Mr Proctor. This kept everyone pretty busy for much of

After games in the garden we were ready to start our Marine Mammal

on the grass during a game of 'Throw Medics course. Mr Proctor and Mr the Welly' and landing badly on his shoulder.

The young man in question was extremely brave and, after a conversation with a doctor, the plane was on its way to take him into hospital where all our fears were confirmed we were told that he had in fact broken his collar bone. All the Watch Group hope he is feeling better soon and wish him a speedy recovery.

Why breast-feeding is best for baby

IN THE past decade we have seen an improvement in the number of women who breast feed, however globally there are still so many women who struggle with breast feeding.

In this article we will look at the well researched benefits of breast feeding for mother, baby, society, an historical perspective of breast feeding and what we as health professionals can do to influence an improvement in breast feeding.

All mammals produce milk especially tailored for their own off spring, we are no different.

The newborn baby knows instinctively that it must join the struggle to survive. Nutritionists agree that breast milk gives babies the best nutritional start in life, and is the best food for baby from birth well into its first year of life; studies show that any amount of breast milk is better than no breast milk at all.

Breast milk comes in attractive packaging, is always at the right temperature and comes free of charge. Breast milk contains proteins, carbohydrates, vitamins, iron, fats especially vital to brain development and antibodies to protect babies from infection. So breast milk is ideal as a food and as a medicine. This is the reason why breast fed babies have less admissions to hospital in their first year of life compared to formula fed infants. They have less incidence and severity of respiratory illness, ear infections, botulism and urinary tract infections.

Breast milk is possibly protective against sudden infant death syndrome, insulin dependant diabetes mellitus, chrohn's disease, ulcerative colitis, allergic disorders, asthma and eczema.

Benefits of breast feeding for mother is less post partum bleeding, the uterus returns to its normal position more rapidly. Often a woman doesn't menstruate while exclusively breast feeding, lessening risk of anaemia and increasing child spacing. Once established, exclusive breast feeding utilises approximately 5-600 calories per day encouraging an earlier return to pre-pregnant weight. There is a reduced risk of ovarian cancer and pre-menopausal breast cancer.

For society there are lower costs associated with breast feeding providing more money for the whole family. Reduced incidence of illness leads to reduced costs for medical care and a reduction in work days lost caring for sick children. No waste products associated with breast feeding compared to tins etc for formula, increasing use of landfills.

With all these advantages why aren't more babies breast fed? To understand this we need to look at

Early BC: At this point in history breast feeding was the only option. Just like other mammals if the human offspring wasn't breast fed it didn't survive. The question would not have been, was an infant breast

fed, but was it breast fed by it's own mother or a relative, friend or wet nurse? (A wet nurse being someone who has breast fed and is then employed to breast feed other babies of women who chose not to feed or couldn't.).

Wet nurses were widely employed in Western Europe by wealthy and noble families while the poor nursed their own children. Wet nurses also nursed orphans. In todays climate this is not an option because of risk of HIV and Hepatitis B being transmitted via breast milk.

Breast milk substitutes became increasingly popular by late 1400. Substitutes included cows milk and goats milk drunk from sucking horns, cans or pots.

Funnily enough during this period there was a resurgence of mothers breast-feeding their own babies, however they had to overcome opposition from older women who had been brought up in the tradition of wet nursing.

Dry nursing (the mixing of flour, bread or cereal with broth or water) became popular. It was cheaper to employ a dry nurse than a wet nurse making hand feeding more prevalent After the industrial revolution women in rural areas continued to breast feed their children just as their mothers had done and for a similar time. Women in manufacturing towns were more likely to supplement with other foods earlier on. During this time infant mortality rates were some to the highest in the textile towns of Northern England where incidence of maternal breast-feeding between 0 - 3 months was as low as 50%. Interestingly during the Manchester cotton famine (early 1860s) work in mills was greatly reduced and women were forced to stay home and breast feed their babies and infant mortality rates dropped dramatically

1930s to post World War II saw the promotion and growth of breast milk substitutes; there was huge money to be made by companies in promoting formula feeding. Today it is a multi million dollar industry. During the post war baby boom, breast feeding halved between 1946 and 1956 dropping to 25% at discharge from hospital. What went wrong? Why did so few mothers succeed at breast feeding some decades back? Why did we lose a generation of breast feeding women?

The main reason lies in the maternity unit system at the time. Soon after birth the baby was whisked away to the nursery and the mothers were not allowed to breast feed for 24 hours, following this they could only feed four hourly. If baby cried before the four hours, formula was given by the nursery staff. Mothers weren't allowed to breast feed at night; instead they were given sleeping pills. The hospital literally took over ownership of the baby. Due to lack of stimulation from the baby suckling at the breast women produced very little milk. There was a huge

problem with painful engorged breasts; the climate was set for breast feeding to fail.

Many grandmothers today had problems with breast feeding because of unfortunate hospital practices when they gave birth. Today some may be worried that their grandchildren will starve before the milk comes in, but term babies have energy reserves to tide them over a few days.

Novadays research shows us what our early forefathers did naturally the more you breast feed the more milk you produce. Babies are smart and they know this, hence the need for frequent suckling in the early days, eight to 12 feeds in 24 hours is normal for a newborn. Night feeding is very important in establishing a good breast milk supply for your baby.

During the first hours after birth the mothers hormonal response to baby's touch is stronger than at any other time, this is an ideal time for skin to skin contact with your baby, assisting in the breast feeding process. Mother's warmth and smell stimulate the baby. Closeness is encouraged with the baby rooming with mother


We now know that breast feeding hormones are sleep inducing, so even if the night is broken you sleep better after breast feeding. The breast milk changes over the course of the feed, baby gets fore milk in the first few minutes of suckling which is a little like sugar and water, then the longer baby suckles at the breast; in comes the hind milk which has a higher fat content and satisfies the baby and assists in weight gain. Hence we tend not to switch sides now so baby has a higher calorie feed. We don't time the baby at the breast, we teach mothers to follow the cues for baby's feeding.

Breast feeding is an art; a skill learned and once mastered is very easy and rewarding. Initially women need good advice and support, beginning in the antenatal period preparing women for breast feeding. Breasts come in all shapes and sizes, all are suited to the task, baby knows no different; he or she will be delighted with your set up.

On going support from experienced committed health professionals and other women that have breast fed is one of the crucial factors for women to keep breast feeding. A supportive partner is very much part of the equation, she who gives nourishment in turn deserves looking after. Father can help by cuddling baby, changing, winding, bathing or settling baby. A newborn baby is a family affair.

Breast feeding is an investment that gives huge returns, your baby is probably healthier and developing better than he / she would have done without your milk.

Your own body has benefited from feeding your baby and the relationship between you and your baby has had the very best start.

Wool report - week ending December 3 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices in South Africa, and New Zealand decreased significantly last week. Greasy prices in Australia were reported up, however, once currency changes were considered and prices expressed in terms of pence per kilogram, prices were also noted as having eased quite considerably.

Price falls over the last two weeks have been severe. As shown in the attached Micron Price Guide, key micron categories relevant to Falkland Islands farmers have lost between 12 and 20 pence per kilogram clean.

In South Africa there was a 96% clearance of the 10,092 bales on offer while in Australia 90.3% of the 55,520 bales available were sold. Included in the Australian offering were 4,952 bales of crossbred wool of which 93% were sold.

A keep fit routine for all the family



SOUNDING almost like an arthritic robot, the peat cutting machine whirrs and clanks its way through many metres of heavy wet peat in a day.

Once the main source of fuel for heating and cooking in the Falklands; peat was essential to every household and the bane of both men and women's lives.

The menfolk faced the backbreaking task of cutting the heavy partially-decomposed vegetable matter from the ground with a spade. Each household required about 200 cubic yards each year with each yard weighing a ton. Some men became adept at the task and top peat cutters have been known to churn out up to one hundred yards in a day.

Once cut and scattered on the bank and left to partially dry it then had to be 'rickled,' arranged in heaps so the air can circulate and finish the drying process. At this point the whole family got to work and many an enjoyable weekend was spent rickling and picnicking. The next stage was to cart it home and store it in the peat shed before it could be burned to produce heat for the home.

Once delivered to the peat shed door Stanley's youngsters were again hard at work. There was a competitive edge involved in spotting a load being tipped to contact the house owner and offer to 'throw it in' for a small fee.

Still the work went on, peat buckets had to be kept full, often a chore allocated to a child in the household, ashes removed from the stove and a continuous supply of peat fed into it. No such thing as setting the temperature on the oven when it came to baking, the housewife had to stoke to achieve a temperature and maintain it - an operation almost akin to driving a steam engine!

Then there was the continuous dust generated from first the peat and then the ashes which had to be chased around the house. However the peat burning stove was not treated as the enemy you would expect. Most homes housed a gleaming clean 'Rayburn' lovingly dusted down after each refuelling operation and women judged each other's housekeeping skills by the state of the Rayburn.

It is easy to become nostalgic with memories of the tangy, peat smoke filled air that would hang over Stanley on a calm winter's morning as each household stoked the banked down stoves back to life ready for the daily routine, but few would like to return

to the system.

Mike Triggs still cuts peat each year with a Klasmann machine imported by Joe Newell in 1992 which he purchased the following year.

At the peak of the business Mike was cutting about 15,000 linear metres each year for Stanley and Camp customers, churning out 800 metres a day on occasion. He said the machine is normally set to cut at a rate of 80 metres an hour but production depends on the peat bank type and condition, with most around Stanley being short and in poor condition.

More recently the amount of peat supplied by Mike has dropped to 2-3.000 yards and few houses use it as the main source of fuel, mainly for the open grate on a winter's evening. Mike says there is still a large demand in Camp for peat however he has had to withdraw the service out side of Stanley due to his bad back.

With rising fuel prices and more efficient peat burning stoves, peat could still be a fairly economic way to heat the home.

Mike will cut private banks at £2 per linear metre. You would have to cart it yourself but think of the keep fit benefits for all the family and what you would save on Leisure Centre fees, not to mention the character building responsibilities for the youngsters in having to keep the peat buckets full.

But don't be scared off... If you don't like the idea of such a strenuos workout, Mike will also deliver the goods to your property at £150 per load, sufficient for those winter evenings around the open grate making toast, crumpets and mulled wine.

Torture survivors from Pinochet's dictatorship name tormentors

FORMER Chilean political prisoners are keeping pressure on Ricardo President Lagos administration by releasing a list of 2.000 people allegedly involved in human rights abuses and cover-up related crimes

The list follows the release of the recently published official report on torture during Augusto Pinochet's dictatorship.

The Former Political Prisoners Coordination organisation also demanded that President Lagos publish the names of torturers included in the official report and hand the list to justice officials.

The recently published report drafted by the 'Valech Commission' established that 27,255 people were tortured during the 1973-1990

Pinochet dictatorship and that torturing prisoners was official policy.

Interior Minister Jose Miguel Insulza said the report's issuance in no way precludes the victims' filing suits or criminal complaints against their torturers, although proving torture committed 30 or more years ago may be "difficult.

The Coordinator's report titled: "We, the Survivors, Accuse" also probes the role of the legal system and press during the dictatorship.

Former prisoners believe that a concerted operation is underway to "bury" the human rights abuses com-mitted during the Pinochet regime issue, "...without all the truth coming out, with half-baked justice and an insulting compensation," stated Coordinator spokeswoman Liliana

The government has finally acknowledged our stories that date back 30 years and now is stonewalling any further action, and we won't accept this," insisted Ms Mason, "What we want is the names of torturers, those who killed and made us suffer immensely and let the Courts settle the

The 462-page document made up of several sections regarding different branches of law enforcement and the Armed Forces, names those who allegedly were involved in torture and human rights abuses, and is based on the testimony of former detainees, news stories and legal docu-

The document includes names of an estimated 2,000 government security agents and Armed Forces officers, as well as policemen and plainclothes detectives who took part in torture, plus those alleged to have aided, abetted and helped with covering up operations.

President Lagos admitted responsibility for all the illegal arrests and torturing and anticipated that he would ask Congress to approve a life monthly pension for all victims equivalent to 200 US dollars, plus health, housing and education ben-

President Lagos said the 'Valech Commission' report's objective was to help compensate all victims and not open the gates for judicial demands, thus the names of those involved in illegal arrests and torturing have not been included.

2005 promising for meat exporters

THE world's main suppliers of meat (beef, hog, broilers and turkeys) will reach a record 16.7 million tons next year, a 5.4% increase over 2004, according to a report from the United States Agriculture Department.

Brazil is forecasted to remain the leading exporter of beef and poultry for the second year running, while hog production and exports in China. United States and

Canada are expected to reach historic levels

United States total meat exports are forecasted at 3.5 million tons, a 6.4% increase over 2004.

Australia and New Zealand are expected to dominate the Japanese market since the United States and Canada will be absent because of sanitary restrictions following the outbreak of "mad cow" disease in both countries

Three party talks in Gibraltar

THREE-party talks to take forward the 27 October joint statement between the Foreign Secretary Jack Straw and Spanish Foreign Minister Mr Moratinos have taken place at Mr Straw's official residence at Chevening House in Kent on December 8 and 9

The talks, which involve the Gibraltarian Chief Minister Peter Caruana, will consider the creation of a new forum for dialogue over Gibraltar. As the joint statement noted, this forum would provide Gibraltar with its own distinct voice, and would have an open agenda.

"It follows that future discussion over Gibraltar would take place through a three-sided dialogue rather than a bilateral negotiation," said the statement

Road route debate continues

A PETITION calling for the rerouting of the new road to Murrell Farm, the home of Adrian and Lisa Lowe, is to be passed to the Transport Advisory Committee (TAC)

Approximately sixty people signed the petition, which was presented to the Planning and Building Committee last month, asking for the part of the road which crosses at Mastin's Point to be redirected to cross at Drunken Rock Pass

Campaigners argued that a crossing at Mastin's Point would spoil the area's recreational appeal. The petition was discussed by councillors in their General Purposes Committee (GPC) meeting held on Wednesday.

Chairman of the Planning and Building Committee, Councillor Richard Cockwell said. "The petition came to us but it is not our decision to make - it was suggested in GPC that the proper place for the petition is the TAC

"Councillors had informal discussions on the subject but the formal decision cannot be made by GPC

He confirmed the petition will be passed to the TAC

Councillor Stephen Luxton said GPC believes the financial impact of rerouting makes it unlikely. He commented, "The general feeling was that the significant extra cost

outweighed other concerns. The rerouting to Drunken Rock Pass would cost an additional amount in the region of £200.000

Campaigners for the rerouting believe the Murrell estuary is an unspoiled beauty spot and a road at Mastin's Point would disrupt this.

However. Environmental Plan-

ning Officer Dominique Giudicelli, who visited the site on Tuesday, had different views

She said, "We tried to be as comprehensive as possible when looking at the Drunken Rock route's impact on the landscape, wildlife and road construction materials, the affect on the burrow pit and the impact on the Lowe family.

"The landscape assessment was quite critical. If the road was to run up to a point possibly much wider than the existing proposed bridge at the crossing point at Drunken Rock, visually it would be more intrusive as it is a long view devoid of any built features, up the straight valley then crossing the river at the bend.
"It would mean extra scarring to

the landscape, particularly on the northern side, as the slope is quite steep and it would mean cutting in to the hillside. That and a new bridge could radically change the character of the valley.

She added, "Extra construction materials would have to be extracted and this could result in the burrow pit being five times its intended size This would definitely have implications for the landscape."

The petitioners also feared a crossing at Mastin's Point would lead to overfishing of the river. Ms Giudicelli felt that by, "...creating an extra one kilometre or so of road next to the river, this would increase access opportunities to the river and could lead to more fishing.

Don't waste water

THE government is urging Stanley residents to keep an eye on their water consumption but has assured that the current level is far from critical.

Water Supervisor at the Public Works Department, Craig Paice, says that while supply from the Moody Brook reservoir is keeping up with demand, people should be careful with consumption, "...and if they spot anything such as a leak or water lying around, please contact the Water Department.

He says the situation is far from severe, comparing it with 2001. when the Falklands experienced a particularly dry spell.

"In 2001, we recorded 16mm in September, 8mm in October and 13mm in November while in 2004, 39mm in both September and October and 9mm in November Rainfall to this point in December 2001 was 3mm, and 6mm in December 2004

"These are hardly impressive levels for 2004 but, given that supply was maintained in 2001, it seems reasonable to think that even if rainfall continues to be very low supply should be able to meet normal usage into late January

Mr Paice said a dry weather plan exists, "...which starts with requests to reduce consumption, as voluntary action by consumers is preferable to imposing limitations.

He confirmed that funds have been entered into the Capital Budget for a second water source to be established from the Murrell River and. "...it is hoped work will commence on that project in 2006/07."

Offer of help met with angry rock attack

A SERVICEMAN who "flipped" and threw a rock inside a vehicle full of people after they stopped to offer him help has narrowly avoided being sent to prison.

Dale Shane Blackford (20), admitted throwing rocks inside and at the vehicle of Mrs Mandy Heathman; in the vehicle were six other passengers, four of whom were children.

Crown Prosecutor Ros Cheek told the court Mr Blackford and a friend visited Stanley for the weekend on December 4 and 5. They spent Saturday evening around the pubs of Stanley and on Sunday visited Gypsy Cove and other areas of

At approximately 4pm they went the FIC West Store where Mr Blackford started to shake uncon-

trollably. His friend, Mr Brunton. suggested he go to the hospital but he refused.

They left the West Store and travelled to Eliza Cove to look at damage caused recently by a fire on

Mr Blackford again began to shake and asked Mr Brunton to stop the vehicle; again he refused the sug-gestion of going to the hospital. Mr Blackford then walked around the wehicle picked up a rock and threw it at the vehicle. Mr Brunton was "shocked and scared" so drove off and left Mr Blackford by the road.

Mrs Heathman was driving on the Eliza Cove Road and noticed the military vehicle and a man walking behind. The six passengers in the vehicle included four children aged from four to thirteen

After turning around and heading back towards Stanley Mrs Heathman noticed Mr Blackford still walking and suggested she ask if he needed assistance. She stopped and her elder daughter who was sitting in the front passenger seat wound down the window to ask . "... are you

Mr Blackford gave a "two fingered gesture" in response. Mrs Heathman noticed that he was pale and wore an expression as if, spaced out with anger.

He threw a stone though the open front passenger window which passed in front of the passenger and driver, connecting with the drivers window with sufficient force to break it, then walked off.

RETURNING to say hello to the current staff of *Penguin News* in the paper's 25th year gave me an almost palpable sense of *deja vu*. To my surprise. I found that the *PN* had moved back to the same offices in the General Employees Union HQ where colleague Rob McBride and I had hammered away on typewriters, nursed foolscap sheets from a Roneo 750 duplicator, and sniggered at the latest subversive antics of that champion of local satire. Little Chav.

The ancient kit has gone, replaced by flat screen monitors, digital cameras, and considerably more pleasant faces, but I still feel at home. The phone continues to buzz with calls from readers who want to include a Christmas message in the next edition, buy some advertising space or help out with the "true facts" of a story.

More than anything, it seems to me that the paper still occupies an important space at the heart of the community, providing a cohesive influence and a soap box for dissent. Publication is, I must confess, much more reliable and frequent. PN is probably a much more important paper than ever it was.

So, congratulations to *Penguin News* in its 25th year, and congratulations also to the hard workers (only those who work on a newspaper can really know how much hard work it is) who continue to ensure that there is a newspaper that informs, entertains and puts its leaders on the spot when necessary.

What else is in the forefront of my mind as I return home after a few years absence?

Well, I am in the lucky position of being able to return to Stanley every few years, and so I notice few radical changes. However, on this visit, as previously. I strikes me that the social and economic divisions of years ago have gone. I may yet be told that they have been replaced by something equally bad, but for now I am again delighted to see that the invidious class differences that once existed have vanished. One's status, influence and power are no longer defined by place of birth (England was always better than the Falklands and the Falklands better than the South American mainland), profession or ownership of land. Government and Falklands affairs generally are in the hands of Islanders.

Egalitarian is the word that most easily describes Falklands society for me now. Some readers will disagree (and I hope they do. because that is what keeps the *PN* letters page buzzing) but just remember what this place used to be like.

Little Chay, of course, did not use long words like egalitarian, but even he would know that things are a lot better than they were.

Public meeting news

Funding for rock phosphate 'worthwhile'

INVESTMENT in rock phosphate is worthwhile for "long term gain, not speedy results" councillors told Tuesday evening's public meeting.

They were responding to a number of written questions regarding the cost involved in purchasing 1704.6 tonnes of rock phosphate in 2000.

Reading a response from the Senior Agriculture Advisor. Councillor John Birmingham said the rock phosphate was purchased to provide a cost effective slow release source of phosphorous and a useful source of calcium for blocks of ground under pasture and forage crop development, particularly those with legumes included in the programme.

He confirmed the rock phosphate cost approximately £105.00/ tonne to purchase and freight to the Islands. In 2003 it was estimated that 400 tonnes remained in storage (out of 1704.6 tonnes). The 400 tonnes were rebagged at a cost of £10.50/tonne for the 400 tonnes.

In 2003 an additional 143 tonnes of rebagged rock phosphate were distributed, leaving an estimated 257 tonnes remaining in storage in Stanley.

Asked what the economic benefits had been of deploying rock phosphate, councillors said a full economic analysis has not been completed; however the Senior Agricultural Advisor says it is clear that Falkland Islands soils are extremely deficient in both phospho-

rous and calcium and as such growth responses are expected, "...particularly as the move towards rotational cropping and for-

age cropping progresses."

As to whether any rock phosphate has actually been used by farmers, the meeting heard that farmers have been asked to apply a rigorous model of cost/benefit to the conduct of their pasture and forage cropping activity in recent times. "As a result some farmers have deliberately chosen to delay the spreading of their rock phosphate until tasks with greater return of investment have been completed."

Councillor Birmingham read, "Obviously not all farmers were ready to progress pasture development or forage cropping. As a result some stocks remain on-farm waiting to be spread. Importantly, much has been spread and is undoubtedly contributing to growth."

The meeting was also told that the 257 tonnes of rock phosphate remaining in storage in Stanley is in a suitable condition for spreading through a conventional spreader.

through a conventional spreader.

The Department of Agriculture has been working with the Rural Business Association over the last several months to formulate a plan to dispose of the remaining stocks of rock phosphate to interested farmers

"Progress has been made and an announcement is expected early in the New Year."

Horse grazing could save government money

PRESSURE on government budgets has lead to the suggestion of introducing horse grazing areas within Stanley.

Councillor Birmingham said this idea would help reduce the price to government of having the grass mown on green areas around town. The areas would be cordoned off with temporary fencing, possibly electric fencing.

He said the idea had come from

within government, not from horse owners.

A plan has been drafted showing suggested areas for grazing, however councillors and public alike agreed on Tuesday that some areas were inappropriate, particularly those used by tourists as a thoroughfare.

The matter was to be discussed by General Purposes Committee on Wednesday.

Office feasibility study presented next month

THE Chief Executive will report on a feasibility study into the future of government office buildings, including the Secretariat and Cable Cottage, at the January meeting of Standing Finance Committee.

Councillor Birmingham said it was "highly unlikely" that quick action would be taken with the re-

pair/replacement of the buildings, due to the strict budget measures in

place.

A member of the public asked why the study had been conducted when no money was available to act upon its recommendations; Councillor Binningham commented, "...we're spending an arm and a leg on maintenance."

Does delayed mail sit at Mount Pleasant?

WHY is mail that arrived in the Islands last week still sitting at Mount Pleasant?

That question was put to councillors by a member of the public. He added that the mail often, "...sits there for days."

The panel appeared surprised by this question and Councillor

Norma Edwards commented, "If there is mail out there, we should get it."

Councillors said the Customs and Immigration Department (which brings mail into town from Mount Pleasant) were to receive a larger vehicle to allow more mail to be transported on each trip.

Foreign Office funding for business projects

THE Foreign Office is offering funding for projects which help to diversify the economy.

First Secretary Harriet Hall told Penguin News that every year the Foreign office makes available funds from the Economic Diversification Budget for projects which "...cn-hance Overseas Territories' economic bases and lessen dependance on primary sectors such as tourism or fishing

"It aims to provide funding to support small enterprises and entrepreneurial talent to either launch new business or expand existing activities, particularly in non-traditional areas

She cited a number of projects supported this year. "Anguilla has bought a printing machine and a telecoms liberalisation study has been done in the British Virgin Islands; in Monserrat they have done a feasibility study on converting volcanic ash into building material and gone to FIDC to create a facility to produce DVDs and CD ROMs locally

The UK financial year runs from April to March and some money has been allocated already this year but there are funds left for spending in the first three months of next year and people are invited to bid

Ms Hall commented, "There is an application form they need to fill in with some guidance notes attached which they can get from me or from anyone at Government House; it's available electronically or as a hard copy."

She added. "It should have a pri-

vate sector focus - it's not for government - and projects have to be open to audit and evaluation.

You should, in the bid, list what benefits you expect to get, in par-ticular if you are going to create employment or create new income for the Territory."

As a result of the incident, Ms Cheek said, the children had shown signs of distress.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds told Mr Blackford his behaviour was unacceptable. She said, "This is not something anyone would expect on a Sunday afternoon unless in a very bad locality and certainly not in the Falklands.

Mrs Faulds said the fact that Mr Blackford had no previous convic-tions "scraped" him out of a prison sentence although she had given serious consideration to imprison-

Mr Blackford was fined £500 for each of the offences, £104.93 as the cost of repairs to the vehicle plus 170 costs with 14 days to pay.

Mrs Faulds said he should not expect such leniency if he were to ever appear before the court again.

Royal Mail: we can't guarantee delivery times

ROYAL MAIL says it does not track "ordinary airmail" nor does it offer a guaranteed delivery time for airmail.

Responding to a query from Penguin News following weeks of airmail delays, a spokesperson for Royal Mail confirmed that no backlog of Falklands mail now exists within its network and "Everyone here is well aware of the particular value associated with this despatch."

The spokesperson confirmed that upon posting a letter in Great Britain, "...one does enter into a contract with Royal Mail. We publish delivery aims but we do not offer a guaranteed delivery time for airmail.

He also confirmed that in "certain exceptional circumstances" Royal Mail may pay some compensation to customers, "...as a good will gesture.'

Quarantine declaration cards introduced

ANY passengers who have arrived by Lan for the past three weeks will have noticed that they are now required to fill in a quarantine declaration card prior to leaving the airport.

These declaration cards have been introduced in order to help protect the agricultural industry in the Falkland Islands from the importation of unwanted plant or animal diseases.

Seasoned travellers will be aware that such declaration cards have been used in countries such as Australia. New Zealand and Chile for several years now. Like the Falkland Islands these countries all have an important agricultural sector and they all enjoy freedom from most of the world's most serious plant and animal diseases.

It is generally considered a much better (and cheaper) option to prevent the entry of a disease at the border rather than have to control or eradicate the disease after it has gained entry.

Quarantine declaration cards form a part of this border security. Diseases such as Foot and Mouth Disease can be brought into the Falkland Islands via food items and can then infect animals in the Falklands. This is exactly what happened in the UK in 2001.

Although an animal disease such as Foot and Mouth may not seem relevant to your daily life, the truth is that it affects us all. It is estimated that the Foot and Mouth outbreak in 2001 cost the British economy £8 billion – and devastated the farming industry and severely affected the tourism industry. The consequences of a Foot and Mouth outbreak in the Falkland Islands would be equally devastating.

All passengers are required to fill in these declaration cards including returning Falkland Islands residents.

On Lan flights they are normally handed out by the cabin staff at the same time as they are issuing immigration cards—this might mean that some Falkland Island residents do not receive a quarantine declaration card on the plane. Even if you are not issued with one on the plane you can pick up a declaration card from the immigration desk in the arrival hall.

Once you have cleared Immigration you will be asked to hand your quarantine declaration card to an official who will be standing there specifically for this purpose.

Anyone who has answered yes to any of the questions on the card will be questioned further and any plant or animal products or farm equipment such as shearing gear will be examined more closely.

After examination the products may be let through, removed for further examination or cleaning, or confiscated altogether.

If you are in any doubt about whether you should bring something back to the Falkland Islands from your trip abroad then it is probably best not to do so. If you already have an idea that you would like to bring certain animal or plant products back with you then it would be sensible to check whether this is permitted with the veterinary or plant section of the Department of Agriculture before you leave the Islands.

Initially the quarantine declaration cards are being introduced on the Lan flights only. Once it has been assessed how they are working and whether any changes need to be made to the contents of the card they will eventually be introduced on the RAF flights from Brize Norton.

Argentines won't complain

THE Argentine Foreign Ministry says it will read add to the list of recent diplomatic upsets with Chile by complaining about a visit made by Chilean businessmen to the Falklands.

According to Buenos Aires daily La Nacion, an excursion to the Falklands by businessmen from the Anglo-Chilean Chamber of Commerce produced a brief, ironically-charged comment from the Argentine Foreign Ministry. "We notice that a chamber which has the promotion of trade between Chile and the UK as its objective is proposing to do business with a part of Argentine national territory, which is what the Malvinas Islands are," said a Ministry spokesmen.

The comment followed coverage in Chilean paper *La Tercera* of the visit to the Falklands by three representatives of the Chilean-British Chamber of Commerce.

La Nacion reports that the Argentine Foreign Ministry this week appeared "disinclined" to add this episode to the list of recent diplomatic upsets with Chile, above all those provoked by the critical comments made by the Chilean Foreign Minister about the Justicia Party and President Kirchner, some time before his appointment, or the presence of the Chilean Ambassador to the United Kingdom at the Lincoln's Inn reception in London in June.

Q LAST week listening to the news I heard that crude oil prices had dropped from \$55 to \$42 a barrel. I also heard that SSL fuel prices had increased. What justification is there for the recent increase in fuel prices?

Stanley Services Ltd General Manager Robert Rowlands provided the following answer.

A STANLEY Services Ltd has to plan the steady supply of petrol arriving in the islands, from time of purchase until arrival here which might be four to five weeks and in that time whilst the international price might have fallen the product might have been purchased at the height of the market.

The current global market continues to fluctuate on a daily basis. However, the last increase in fuel

prices by Stanley Services Ltd have been brought about by matters other than the International Oil price.

Petrol now has to be imported by containerised tanks due to the small

volumes consumed, this has brought a large increase in the cost of the product. It was decided to increase the price gradually by averaging out the cost of the stock in storage and that enroute.

The rise in Kerosene prices have again been brought about by the large increase in costs of the product to the Company; due to existing storage capacity and lack of availability of a suitable tanker we currently have no alternative supply chain for this

Police officer rumour is 'unsubstantiated'

A RUMOUR alleging improper behaviour of two police officers has been deemed "unsubstantiated" by a police spokesperson.

The rumour, which alleged that two officers behaved improperly while on duty, is unproven, the police spokesperson said.

He commented, "The matter has been looked into by the Police and the rumour appears to be entirely unsubstantiated.

"I FOUND a force, which I think is up to the task," This was the opinion Foreign British Commonwealth Office police advisor, Chris Burgess, on the competence and procedures with firearms of the Royal Falkland Islands Police.

Speaking to Corina Goss of the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station on Tuesday, Mr Burgess said that he had found in the Falklands a small force, but one which was very dedicated and very professional in

terms of its firearms capabilities.
He continued, "What you have got is a force that can respond, albeit on a small scale. I would say that they are probably as good as one is likely to get, given their numbers; they've got very good equipment and they've got other equipment on order, ballistic protection type equipment, but obviously not weapons, because they are very well equipped in that regard.

Mr Burgess was making his first tour of the British Overseas Territories in the South Atlantic Islands. He had started in St.Helena, and visited Ascension Island before arriving in the Falklands, where he had spent a week with the RFIP. Later in the year, he hopes to be able to visit Tristan da Cunha.

Mr Burgess's method assessment involves visiting police forces to talk to as many people as possible of all ranks, but especially firearms trainers, chiefs of police and authorised firearms officers. Besides looking at their equipment, he is also keen to observe their standing orders in relation to firearms, their weaponry and their training. In addition he is interested in their backup in terms of such factors as first aid training, the availability of paramedical assistance, communications and transport

Commenting with regard to the South Atlantic, that incidents involving firearms were "thankfully few" Mr Burgess said that nevertheless it was essential that police forces were properly equipped and trained to meet such incidents. Chief Police Officers had a duty of care to their officers, which extended through them to Governors and as far as the UK Government and should things go badly wrong through lack of proper training or equipment they could face litigation for dereliction of this duty.

Mr Burgess commented that it was not particularly difficult for people to acquire a firearms licence in the Falklands and that this was not a bad thing because firearms were regarded principally as tools and the Falklands lacks the problems that currently exist in Britain. He was not particularly worried by the level of firearms held in the Falklands. because there isn't a history of armed crime in the Falklands. However, he said, it was good to see that the Chief of Police had considerable discretion to impose his own rules and regulations under the Firearms Ordinance, citing as an example the ban on the importation of pumpaction shotguns by previous Chiefs of Police, which meant that they were now becoming scarce.

Mr Burgess told FIBS that it was

his job simply to point out to Governors or chiefs of police the posible consequences of not responding to his recommendations. He worked to the Association of Chief Police Officers Manual of Guidance on Police Use of Firearms and expected that overseas territories would take it all on board. or at least extract those elements which appeared to apply to their own situations.

With regard to the Royal Falkland Islands Police, the FCO inspector said that there would be one or two recommendations coming out of his report, "but nothing major."

'We know we'll find gold'

DAVID Hudd, the head of Falkland Island Holdings (FIH), has told the Telegraph about his firm's drive to modernise

Mr Hudd compared Falkland Island Holdings to a "mini Jardine Matheson," (FIH), in a reference to the famous Hong Kong-based conglomerate.

There are similarities: both were founded on British islands on distant parts of the globe in the first half of the 19th century and both have interests ranging from hotels, retailing and property to dealing in cars. But there the similarities end.

The Telegraph reports the difference in scale between the two companies as so vast it is comical: "When Hudd said mini, he meant Jardine Matheson turned micro.' over £4.7bn last year and employs 105,000 people. Its counterpart in the South Atlantic employs 120 people and has a turnover of just £11.5m.

However the Telegraph says Mr Hudd hopes the disparity may be about to narrow a little: "With the islands' traditional mainstay of squid fishing inysteriously in decline (scientists are trying to find out why). Hudd has engineered something of an oil and gold prospecting boom.

Last week saw the flotation on Aim of Falkland Gold and Minerals, of which Mr Hudd is deputy chairman, and in which FIH owns a 14 per cent stake. The public offering of shares in the company raised £10m to pay for a drilling programme to determine whether there are economic deposits of the precious metal on the islands.

Meanwhile, in September Mr Hudd oversaw, also as deputy chairman, the flotation of Falkland Oil and Gas - which raised £7m to pay for a seismic survey of the 33,700 sq km of offshore oil and gas fields the company holds to the south and east of the islands. FIH owns 28 per cent of the oil explorer.

"I became chairman of Falkland Island Holdings in 2002 and the first thing I decided was that I wanted to make sure we participated fully in any oil and minerals discovered there, it would have just been too ironic that we had been there since 1851 and not been a part of it if anything is found.

The newspaper article says the prospect of mineral riches beneath the "windswept outcrop" has already done wonders for FIH's share price. Shares in the company started the year at 186p but by November had soared as high as 722p and currently trade at about 670p, making FIH one of the best performing stocks on AIM.

The Telegraph says Hudd has also raised the company's profile by making a hostile £10m bid for another historic anomaly of a company: Portsmouth Harbour Ferry Company. The Portsmouth ferry company is owned by some 300 local families, mainly descendants of the original shareholders dating back to 1883. "FIH's approach, at £47.30 a share, proved hard to resist on economic grounds and the ferry company's management con-ceded defeat last week. Apart from that diversification, FIH is focused purely on the Falkland Islands.

The article continues, "Soon after joining the company, Mr Hudd visited the islands and met a geologist, Derek Reeves, who was originally sent to the Falklands to search for diamonds on the theory that the islands were part of South Africa several billion years ago. South Africa is one of the world's richest mining regions. Sampling of gravel in streams on the islands did reveal indicator minerals for diamonds but also came up with plentiful grains of gold.

Because of the strong price of gold (recently at a 17-year high) and oil, Mr Hudd says he pushed to raise enough money - at first through private placings and now through public offerings - to see both the oil and gold companies through to the next stage of exploration.

Mr Hudd is quoted as saying, "We went to see RAB Capital [the fund manager that has specialised in financing early-stage resources exploration companies], they put in £1m, we put in £1m and we borrowed £1m to fly a magnetic survey of the islands."

The Telegraph says, "...despite some Argentinian intransigence the country allows only scheduled flights (sic) to the islands to pass through its airspace - a light plane was able to fly there from Brazil in January and carry out the survey.

"We've identified 23 magnetic anomalies which now need to be drilled," Derek Reeves, the operations manager of Falkland Gold said. "We know we'll find gold and quartz veins but we don't know how wide they are."

The Telegraph reports two drill rigs are en route to the South Atlantic and 1,200 holes are planned to be drilled into promising locations early next year. The resulting samples should be analysed by July, at which point the company will have a reasonable idea of whether there are large gold deposits on the islands.

The article mentions the Falkland Islands Company (FIC) as one of FIH's subsidiaries saying FIC was awarded a Royal Charter in 1852, giving it the rights to much of the land mass of the islands. "The company still has the charter but it has sold most of the land to the government, retaining plots suitable for housing or commercial development should the islands' economy suddenly take off on the back of a major oil strike.
"The power the company

wields is a sensitive issue among the 2,500 islanders and Mr Hudd won't say how much the shop contributes to turn over.

"We're obviously a powerful company down there, "Mr Hudd says, "but we no longer have the right to appoint someone to the leg-islative council." And he adds that not all of the company's income is derived from the islanders.

"We sell a lot of stuffed pen-

Having taken considerable chances and risks with our own breeding activities in the past, all my instincts are against getting involved in such a massive programme as was outlined at a recent meeting I attended. This is mainly on the basis of aftercare management requirements for implanted ewes that have never been intensively managed.

In terms of potential results from successful carry through, the benefits for the meat industry which will rely on dead sheep rather than live ones bearing wool, are huge and would be immensely

beneficial. I have no doubt.

But from the wool production aspect, I would not assume that ram hoggets from a 2005 programme could be used in 2006, "If they were mature enough...

I would be more concerned with whether they had shown up their true characteristics at that age, when the results from the gene pools used so far, have varied from outstanding to diabolical.

It is not just about production characteristics when you are the farmer intending to seek long term sustainability of your choice and

I firmly believe that performance of the National Stud Flock and Falkland Landholdings sheep will not be helped by a twelve month relocation hash about either. Nick Pitaluga

Association reshuffle but support for Islanders remains

By Harold Briley in London A MAJOR change in the leadership of the Falkland Islands Association has brought renewed pledges of support for Falkland Islands' self-determination and determined resistance to Argentina's persistent

sovereignty claim.
Sir Rex Hunt, CMG former Governor of the Falkland Islands, has been succeeded as Chairman of the Association by another former Governor, Mr David Tatham, CMG. Leading the tributes to Sir Rex Hunt's leadership during the 1982 war and ever since, Mr Tatham declared at the Association's Annual General Meeting: "Rex is not just a hard act but an impossible act to follow. I will do my best'

In a key passage, re-affirming rejection of the Argentine threat, Mr Tatham declared: "I am committed as we all are to the future of the Falkland Islands, to the right of the people to determine that future and to the need to fend off pressures from outside and to make sure that Government and public opinion of this country are fully behind the Islands and the Islanders'

His election was unanimously endorsed at the Association's annual general meeting in London (on Saturday 11 December) following the annual ceremony of tribute to British servicemen who died in battles linked to the Falkland Islands in two World Wars and the 1982 Conflict.

In his final report as chairman, Sir Rex Hunt echoed the strong stance by the British Government in resisting Argentina's sovereignty claim. Sir Rex, who is 78, will continue to have a significant role in the Association. He was unanimously elected a Vice-President, amid eloquent tributes to him by the Vice-Chairman, Mr Saul Pitaluga, Falklands-born British businessmen. and the Reverend Peter Millam, former Rector of Stanley's Christ Church Cathedral.

Sir Rex Hunt plans to move home with Lady Hunt from Southem England to his roots in the North. to be near his daughter and grandchildren in Yorkshire.

David Tatham has had a distinguished Foreign Office career as a much travelled diplomat. Though his time as Falklands Governor was a more peaceful if still uneasy period than that of Sir Rex Hunt, he has witnessed turmoil and conflict in other parts of the world as a Middle East expert and Arabist and in his final diplomatic post as High Commissioner to Sri Lanka during the Tamil Tiger insurrection. More recently he drew up Foreign Office proposals for a Palestinian Foreign Office.

He has several close links with the Falkland Islands. He was a popular Governor between 1992 and 1995 and a former head of the Foreign Office Falkland Islands Department in London. He continues his contacts as a trustee and Executive Committee member of the Falkland Islands Trust, Chairman of the Shackleton Scholarship Fund, a founder member of the South Georgia Association, and compiler of a future Dictionary of Falklands Biography from 1592 to 1981 which will include many prominent Falk-

lands personalities.

He told the meeting he was very conscious he was joining an Association that is working well. He paid tribute for support and guidance from Mr Ted Clapp, who, as Treasurer, is running the administration virtually single-handedly. He is a former head of the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) in Stanley and is married to a Falkland Islander.

Mr Clapp was re-elected Honorary Treasurer, and Mr Saul Pitaluga Vice-Chairman. The Executive Committee was also re-elected - Mr David Ainslie, Air Commodore Peter Johnson, OBE, Mr Maurice Jones, Mr Peter Lapsley, (Membership Secretary).

Mr Geoff Moir DFC. Mr Ron Lewis-Smith (formerly BAS scientist), and the Honourable Alexandra Shackleton, daughter of the late Lord Shackleton.

Sir Rex Hunt announced the resignation of the Newsletter Editors. Peter Pepper and Harold Briley, and praised them for producing a magazine of "such high standard" for the past twelve years. The Association has appealed for volunteers to take over as editors. It is also seeking a replacement as Executive Secretary for Mr Andrew Knapp, who has also resigned, and was thanked for his

Sir Rex appealed for more people to join the Association whose membership has increased to 1,057 during a year of intensified harassment of Islanders by President Kirschner's Government in Buenos Aires, to which, Sir Rex Hunt said, "The British Government has reacted strongly...meetings between Councillors and your Committee members have indicated that Islanders are pleased with the strong line on sovereignty taken by the FCO. Councillors say that Minister Bill Rammell keeps them well informed. They are also pleased with the blunt warning given to Argentina by the Governor and the outgoing British Ambassador to Argentina. The Am-



bassador Designate, Dr John Hughes, spent a week in the Falkland Islands before taking up his post in Novem-

Sir Rex pledged that the Association will continue to work closely with the Falkland Islands Government Office in London and Courcillors in the Islands in upholding the Falkland Islanders' right to self-determination. He quoted from former Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher in the House of Commons after the 1982 invasion: "They are few in number, but they have the right to live in peace, to choose their own way of life and to determine

their own allegiance".

Mr Tatham said he had been 'very touched" by the memorial ceremony at the Cenotaph in Whitehall preceding the annual meeting. He said it was remarkable that 90 years after the Battle of the Falklands (which destroyed the German South Atlantic Fleet in the First World in 1914), it was still commemorated in this way along with the sacrifices of the British servicemen who died in the 1982 war. The ceremony also commemorates the men lost in the Falklands flotilla's destruction of the German battleship Graf Spee in the Battle of the River Plate in the Second World in 1939.

The service was conducted by the Reverend Peter Millam, a former rector of Christ Church in Stanley, who pointed out that ten per cent of active Falkland Islands manhood gave their lives to the defence of Britain in two Word Wars 1939-1945 and 1914-1918 wars - "far more than any other Commonwealth country including the United King-

A wreath in memory of the Armed Forces was laid by a former British Forces Commander in the Falklands, Brigadier Geoff Sheldon (Colonel of the Queens Lancashire Regiment).

Wreaths were also laid by Sir Rex Hunt for the FIA; Miss Sukey Cameron for the Falkland Islands Government; Mrs Sara Jones, CBE (widow of Lieutenant Colonel H Jones, VC) and Mrs Paula Shear for the Falkland Families Association; Captain Martin Reed (formerly of the liner Canberra in 1982) for the South Atlantic Medal Association of which he is chairman; Miss Kerri-Ann Ross for the young people of the Falkland Islands; Mr Maurice Jones for the Association of Men of Kent and Kentish Men, which has traditional links with the Falkland Islands and the First World War battle; and by Lieutenant Commander Roger Wager, who served in the Royal Navy in the 1982 Falklands War.

The Royal Naval Colour Party were led by Chief Petty Officer Pincher Martin from HMS Collingwood in Portsmouth, who served on HMS Antrim in the 1982

They were accompanied by representatives of Pangbourne College and a Falkland Islands Defence Force member, student Zoran Zuvic.

Fisheries Commission cautious about illex

THE South Atlantic Fisheries Commission is recommending the adoption of a "precautionary approach" in the fishing of illex.

The meeting was held, as usual, under the sovereignty umbrella.

At its twenty-sixth meeting, held in Buenos Aires last week, the SAFC noted the serious concerns raised by its Scientific Sub-Committee (SSC) regarding the status of the illex stock, particularly that recruitment and catches in 2004 were the lowest on record.

According to a statement from the meeting, "It also noted that the level of spawning biomass of illex remaining at the end of the 2004 season was the lowest observed." In addition, it was noted that prevailing oceanographic conditions appeared to be unfavourable for recruitment. They therefore recommended the "precautionary ap-

The Commission also endorsed the recommendations of the SSC that the subsequent escapement target for an enhanced Early Warning System should be 90,000-95,000 of spawning stock biomass present in the fishery in the last week of April, a mid-point of the period of maximum reproduction.

The Committee agreed to recommend this enhancement of the Early Warning System to both gov-

The statement from the meeting said, "It is significantly more precautionary, as compared to the target of 40,000 tonnes for the spawning stock biomass at the end of the season with a much higher target for spawning stock biomass during the period of peak reproduc-tive activity of the stock."

The Commission further recommended that a joint survey to assess recruitment of the illex stock should take place in February 2005.

During the meeting, both the British and Argentine delegations reaffirmed the importance of ensuring the sustainability of fish stocks and reiterated the commitment of both governments to the conservation of the fish and squid stocks of the South West Atlantic. According to the press statement, they recommended to both governments the continuation of further scientific research, "...in order to achieve a greater understanding of the most significant off-shore species in the агеа."

Both delegations referred to practical measures needed to prevent poaching, "...given that it can undermine the maintenance of conservation of fish stocks in the South West Atlantic." They agreed to continue to enhance efforts aimed at achieving these objectives in a "coordinated way".

David had, potentially, a difficult task: to turn up with a camera and to film what were essentially private moments for people at an emotional time. however he said. allowed me to do the job I had come to do."

He describes the film as a "good representation of the trip."

"I have not put any commentary on the film as I thought that there was no need as the veterans and the Islanders themselves said everything there was to say, nor is there any editorial slant for none was needed."

The music that accompanies the film was specially composed

and conducted by Barrington Pheloung, "...one of the finest composers of film/TV scores in the world."

"He agreed to doing the music after being moved when watching the first copy of the film and I am sure that people will agree that the music plays an important role in summing up the emotions we all felt during that week."

Viewers will be moved by not only the documentary itself but the

special features including full length interviews, the Roll of Honour and a history of the Falklands Campaign narrated by Major General Julian Thompson.

A montage of extra film footage from the pilgrimage is particularly moving, fittingly accompanied by Dire Straits' Brothers in Arms

As David says, "...it gives the viewer the opportunity to listen to people talking, not in soundbites, but thoughtfully and taking the time to deal with things that sometimes are not that easy to discuss. It has also allowed me to include much more footage of the Islands and Islanders themselves."

The response from veterans has been "overwhelming", David says. "The letters and e-mails I have received personally allay any fears I had about doing the film and they have made it all the more pleasing as it reached its conclusion."

He says he is interested to gauge the reaction of Islanders:" It is very important to me that those of you who were involved in the pilgrimage get to see the piece and I sincerely hope that you approve of it.

"Your comments and thoughts about the film and the DVD as a whole would be very welcome and I hope that anyone who watches it and is moved in any way would get in touch and tell me what they thought.

"Thank you to all of you who helped me in getting this project completed and as it is certainly my intention to visit the Islands again. I hope that you enjoy the piece."

Welsh Guards to deliver album to museum and bench to Fitzroy

ONE pilgrim from the 2002 SAMA visit went home to Wales with a mission and the fruits of his work will soon be seen in the Islands.

Stephen Hopkins was with the Welsh Guards during the 1982 conflict and while visiting the museum in Stanley, noticed that very few artifacts had been donated by ex Welshguardsmen.

He decided there and then to gather together enough photographs to complete an album to donate to the museum.

Upon his return to Wales, he quickly set about establishing a website welshguardsmen.co.uk, in order that Welsh Guards Veterans could contribute their personal photographs for possible inclusion in the album.

Word spread rapidly and now assisted by another pilgrim Andy "Curly" Jones, originally from Carmarthen, several trips to London were taken to sift through the Welsh Guards archives. Regimental Headquarters of the Welsh Guards also offered to supply an embossed album and the expertise of their curator Peter Pownall.

What started off as a simple

idea, took a lot of hard work and commitment from those involved and the album was completed in February 2004.

During its construction His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales offered to write the forward and on May 5 the album was presented to Prince Charles for his approval. Gathering at Clarence House along with Stephen Hopkins and Curly was the Falkland Islands Representative in London. Miss Sukey Cameron MBE, and Brigadier Ricketts, the Commanding Officer of the 1st Battalion Welsh Guards during the Falklands Campaign. Also present were other veterans and members of the Regimental Headquarters of the Welsh Guards.

The Prince spent an hour going through the album page by page with descriptions of each photograph, which in their own right tells a story, provided by Stephen and Curly. The album is a chronological story of the Welshguardsmen, many of whom did not return home, who took part in the 1982

All that remains now is to take the album to the Falklands and the museum in Stanley, no mean feat in itself. Funding through various agencies has been achieved for Stephen Hopkins and Andy Jones to bring three other veterans back in February 2005 in time for St David's Day.

In addition to the gift of the album, a park bench will be placed at Fitzroy. The bench has been donated by Cwm Environmental Services of Carmarthen to be placed at the site of the disaster of the RFA Sir Galahad on June 8, 1982.

The bench from Carmarthen will be shipped to the Falklands in early January by the Royal Fleet Auxiliary.

General Practice FIBSChart Attack

First Aid: Providing basic life support

BASIC Life Support (BLS) is a way of maintaining both adequate ventilation and circulation in a collapsed patient in cardiorespiratory arrest until a means can be obtained to reverse the cause.

BLS involves rescuers only and no equipment. It is a 'holding operation' only but may occasionally reverse the cause in respiratory failure. Failure of circulation and breathing for three to four minutes causes irreversible brain damage and death, therefore BLS must be instituted without delay, the longer the delay, the less chance of a successful outcome.

Causes of arrest in adults, (eight years and above) can be coronary heart disease influenced by raised blood pressure, obesity, smoking and raised cholesterol and fats in the blood. Arrest can also be caused by breathing problems such as chest injuries, drowning, choking and drug /alcohol intoxication.

In infants and children up to eight years, causes are breathing difficulties and lack of oxygen due to airway obstruction by swelling in infection, foreign bodies, respiratory failure due to exhaustion. It is also due to drowning, choking and injuries as above.

External chest compression works by squeezing the heart and propelling blood forward. It also works by compressing the chest and raising the intrathoracic pressure and propelling the blood forward along the arteries which are open rather than the collapsed

veins

There is a sequence of events which are followed - safety, stimulate, shout for help, airway, breathing, circulation and reassessment.

Safety - the safety of both the rescuers and the victim must be ensured, there must be no further casualties!

Stimulate - gently shake and ask the victim if he/she is all right. If victim responds then go for help. If no response then shout for help.

Airway - place victim on his back, open the airway by tilting the head back and lifting the chin. If damage to the neck is suspected then lift the jaw forward instead. Remove any visible obstruction from the mouth but leave good fitting dentures in place.

Breathing - with the mouth open look, listen and feel for ten seconds. With one's cheek over the victim's mouth look for rise and fall of the chest wall, listen for breath sounds and feel for expired air on the cheek. If breathing, place in the recovery position and go for help, return and reassess.

If not breathing then send or go for help, return and start rescue breathing.

Two slow effective rescue breaths should be given. Use the head tilt/chin lift as above, pinch the fleshy part of the nose, open mouth, deep breath and blow into the mouth for two seconds and watch for rise and fall of the chest, two effective breaths should be given out of five attempts.

Circulation - look for breathing, coughing or movement of the victim - if these are present then a circulation will be present. Check for circulation by feeling the carotid pulse for ten seconds if trained to do so. If a pulse is present then continue with rescue breathing until the victim is breathing spontaneously and then place in the recovery position.

If no circulation is present then with the victim on his back, external chest compression should be started. The heel of one hand should be placed on the lower half of the stemum (breast bone), the other on top with the fingers interlocked, the arms in a vertical position, straight and the chest compressed at a rate of 100 compressions per minute. At age eight or over the rate is 15 compressions to two ventilations.

This should be continued until the victim shows signs of life such as movement or coughing, until qualified help arrives and takes over or until exhausted and unable to continue.

If there is more than one rescuer, go for help immediately. If a single rescuer is present and the victim is an adult then go for help immediately as the problem is likely to be heart related and defribillation will be necessary.

If the victim is a child or a breathing problem is suspected the two rescue breaths and one minute of resuscitation should be given prior to going for help.

In a medium sized bowl, stir together the soy sauce, vinegar, olive oil, orange juice, ginger, garlic, mustard, and brown sugar.

Pour over meat in a shallow container. Make sure all meat is submerged in marinade.

Cover, and refrigerate for at least six hours.



Toy library: promoting development through play

STAFF from the health department are working to establish a toy library and are appealing for the public's help.

A public meeting will be held at 5.00pm on Monday, January 17 at Welcome House on Shackleton Drive.

Most people think of libraries as places to borrow books from. Toy libraries provide a similar service but instead of books toys can be borrowed. Toy libraries allow parents to provide a variety of carefully selected quality toys for their child without the hassle and expense of buying and storing them.

The first toy library was set up in the UK in 1967 by a teacher who had two children with special needs. She became involved with a group of families who got together to exchange toys and fundraise to obtain specialist toys and equipment for their children.

By the early 1970s the idea of toy libraries had become well established and their focus broadened to the current idea of offering all preschool children in the community the opportunity to borrow a range of good quality toys through local toy libraries.

According to Speech and Language Therapist Wendy Martin, as well as lending books, many book libraries invite children to come and listen to stories in structured book reading sessions. Similarly, toy libraries may also offer organized

play sessions which are typically run by people with professional skills and expertise in child development.

"Play sessions can include a variety of activities for example, singing and music making, physical coordination and balance, social language and creative expression."

Toy libraries can also be a point of practical support to parents through the provision of information about how they can foster their child's development through play, what toys are suitable for different ages and how play and toys can develop certain skill areas. Parents can also gain access to information about how to create quality play experiences with inexpensive "junk" and household bits and pieces.

The aim of toy libraries is to promote the cognitive, physical and social development of children through play.

Ms Martin says play is crucially important to children's cognitive, language, physical and social development. "Through play and access to appropriate toys and play experiences, children learn about the world and how it works.

"They learn about themselves and how to relate to other people. They develop their physical strength and coordination through physical movement of their body through space."

Ms Martin says play activities

with balls and puzzles enhance eyehand coordination. "When young children are provided with physical and mental challenges that are appropriate to their skill level, they experience success which supports the development of positive selfesteem and self-concept as effective problem solvers.

"This encourages children to keep on trying to master increasingly difficult tasks."

Ms Martin says a toy library can be a valuable community resource for early childhood that offers equipment and toys for loan, dedicated space for play and specialist resources. "An important principle in setting up a toy library is that the service is inclusive and accessible to children with special needs and their families as part of the wider community."

The public meeting on January 17 is being held to talk, more about the types of services toy libraries can offer. Ms Martin adds, "If you think you might use such a service or, better yet, have ideas and are interested in being involved, we would love to see you.

"Donations of good quality toys that your children have outgrown are also always welcome."

Wool report - week ending December 10 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices in South Africa, and Australia increased compared to previous week's levels, however significant currency changes meant that much of the gain was lost in real terms once prices were converted into a "pence per kilogram basis".

- ☐ In New Zealand, the market was reported weaker overall, but firm in the range most relevant to Falkland Islands wool.
- Wool buyers with Chinese orders were reported to have dominated Australian markets, while in South Africa, topmakers who also buy and process a considerable proportion of the Falkland Islands wool clip, were very active.
- Skirtings with low vegetable matter and good style increased in value during the weeks trading.
- ☐ In South Africa there was a 97% clearance of the 11,779 bales on offer, in New Zealand 87% of the 19,150 bales available were sold, while in Australia 89% of the 64,679 bales available to the trade changed hands. Included in the Australian offering were 7,541 bales of crossbred wool of which 87% were sold.

Argentine families meet new ambassador

"LOW KEY" talks about an inauguration ceremony of the Darwin memorial reported to have taken place between the British Ambassador to Argentina, Mr John Hughes, and representatives of Argentine next of kin was in fact a "getting to know you meeting," according to the Acting Governor, Miss Harriet Hall.

However, Miss Hall said yesterday that the talks were, "...really just a getting to know you meeting."

She reiterated, "It was not a visit to discuss the inauguration."

A small inauguration ceremony organised by the Relative's Committee in August was allegedly stopped by the Argentine Foreign Ministry because among the passengers was the then British Ambassador, Sir Robin Christopher

Furthermore, the Argentine government reportedly objected to the fact that the Relative's Committee spoke directly to the Falklands government, whom the Argentine government refuses to recognise. MP/PN

High seas fishing: agreement needed

SQUID fishing being carried out by Korean and Argentine vessels on the high seas this month highlights the need for a conservation agreement to ensure the future sustainibility of illex, the Director of Fisheries has said.

The Argentine Federal Fisheries Council has authorised vessels with valid illex argentinas squid permits to operate in the high seas outside the Argentine Exclusive Economic Zone for ninety days and last week a number of Korean jiggers were reported to be catching around 4-5 tonnes of illex a day on the high seas north of the Falklands.

Penguin News asked the Falklands Director of Fisheries if this high seas activity would affect the Southern Patagonian stock (SPS) which makes up the Falklands squid fishery.

Dr John Barton commented. "Significant catches on the high seas will have some impact on the SPS illex, although some proportion of the catches may be from other stocks as well."

Falkland Islands fishing vessels are not permitted to catch illex on the high seas until January 1. Dr Barton said, "This has been introduced as a conservation measure for illex. However, unless all or at least

the majority of fleets act accordingly, there is limited benefit to be achieved by extending such an unilateral measure into the new year."

Dr Barton said the evidence at present suggests that at least some of the small amounts of illex being caught on the high seas are from a stock which matures earlier than the SPS. "Hence, this will not necessarily have much impact on our illex fishery."

However he added, in order to ensure the future sustainability of the illex resource, "...it is likely that adequate conservation measures will have to be applied to the entire fishery. This includes high seas areas."

Dr Barton said the Korean catches do not answer the key question of how abundant the SPS illex will be in 2005. "Samples will hopefully be obtained and it will be possible to establish whether any proportion of the catches do come from the SPS illex."

l-le commented, "In general terms some delay in fishing SPS illex on the high seas to allow the biomass to increase would be desirable, and would ideally be a component of any high seas agreement."

However he added, "It will only work if all fishing fleets subscribe to such an arrangement." MP/PN

On Sunday, January 2, Explorer II (200) will be in Stanley while Discovery (330) will visit West Point.

On the 3rd they will swap, with Discovery visiting Stanley and Explorer II heading to West Point and New Island.

Arrest after vehicle fire

A PERSON was arrested this week in connection with a vehicle fire on John Street and later released on police bail.

Inspector Len McGill of the Royal Falkland Islands Police confirmed the person had been released following an interview and bailed to return on January 5.

When asked if public safety was being compromised, he commented, "...all the issues surrounding the incident were carefully considered by the prosecuting authority in the Falklands, the Attorney General, and the decision made to release the person on bail."

Smith trial in February

THE trial of Robert Smith, who faces three charges of child abuse is likely to begin on February 8.

Mr Smith, a resident of Goose Green was in court yesterday to hear that his trial is likely to last three days.

He remains subject to strict bail conditions.



Falklands Suite gathers momentum

WORK on the Falklands Suite is progressing well, according to Shirley Adams-Leach, music teacher at the Community School.

The Suite is a musical composition which will include input from a number of students with the guidance of composer Craig Vear and Dr Jonathan Eato from Exeter University.

The twelve students have met every Thursday for a term and have completed 'ice-breaking' tasks to help them communicate with each other and work as a team.

This may come as a surprise, given the small number of students on the school roll; however Mrs Adams-Leach says, "...some of the students had not actually held a conversation together and as they all have different musical interests and abilities they were quite in awe of each other."

She says one particular task was to improvise and record a piece of music using only junk or voices but no instruments and, once they got going and completed the task. they were all really proud of their finished piece."

As it is a suite, the different movements should have a common theme running through them and Mrs Adams-Leach says suggestions so far are, "sea and fishing, landscape and weather, birds and wildlife, people and camp life and sheep!"

The students have started to

record sounds and conversations for their library or lound sources using the new mini-disc recording equipment purchased with funds raised. They have also started to collect photographs to use as visual stimuli.

Fund raising for the project has been a great success. In November the Falklands Suite Lottery reached the target of £7,000 the minimum required for the project to go ahead so. Mrs Adams-Leach says, "...the flights are booked for Craig Vear and Dr Jonathan Eato to fly to the islands on February 25."

The main part of the project will take place during Camp Sports Week with the welve students spending their heliday in school.

Mrs Adams-Leach adds, "The following week will be used to pull together the composition and present the premier of the work in its basic form to an invited audience of parents and sponsors.

"Craig and Jon will then take the work to the UK and finish the final editing with the help of some of the students in the University Music Department."

On behalf of the students she thanked. "...everyone for their support" and added. "we will up date you before Camp Sports week on our next round of meetings and the next steps of our project.

Suspended sentence for drunken car theft

A SEAFARER who stole a car and crashed it into a nearby shed after a night out has avoided going to jail.

Happy Donkin, an Able Seaman on fishery protection vessel Sigma, received a fourteen day suspended sentence when he appeared before the Senior Magistrate on Thursday.

He pleaded guilty to taking a vehicle belonging to Mr Neil McKay from Callaghan Road in the early hours of December 1 and driving it a short distance before crashing into a shed to the rear of the home of Mr and Mrs Mike Wallace.

His friend, Mr Kevin Ford, also of FPV Sigma, was fined for allowing himself to be carried in a stolen vehicle.

After crashing into the shed, both men fled the scene and returned to their ship which departed Stanley the following morning

A cigarette lighter with the inscription 'Donkey' led to Mr Donkin's identification and Sigma was asked to return to Stanley.

When interviewed, Mr Donkin fully admitted the offences while Mr Ford said he had been so drunk he could recall nothing of the incident. The two men had been out drinking in Stanley's pubs and then at a friend's home prior to the vehicle's theft

In addition to his suspended sentence, Mr Donkin was fined £250 for driving without insurance and ordered to pay £400 compensation for the damage to the shed

Mr Ford was fined £500 for being the passenger in the stolen vehicle and ordered to pay £100 compensation. Both men will also pay prosecution costs of £70.

Also in court on Thursday was Darrel McGill who had earlier pleaded guilty to assaulting his partner.

The Senior Magistrate ordered the preparation of presentence reports and adjourned the case until January 12

Q Is it true that Falkland Islands residents working at Mount Pleasant and paying no tax still receive holiday credits and other entitlements? How is it possible for locals to work at MPA tax free?

A OUR thanks to Tanya Lee, Senior Taxation Officer for providing the following response.

Falkland Islands residents working at MPA but not paying Falkland Islands tax do still receive holiday credits and other entitlements.

For all individuals working at MPA tax free there are certain criteria that have to be met. These include:

* The Employer/Company they work for must appear on the schedule of designated employers held at the Taxation Office.

 The individual must be entitled to accommodation provided by the Employer at MPA.

• The employment must be for the purpose of providing services in the Falkland Islands to her Majesty's regular armed forces or in the Falkland Islands to the Ministry of Defence.

International effort to halt albatross decline

IN SOME species of albatross and petrels, the rate of decline is so serious that extinction is a very real possibility before the year 2050. This was the bald warning issued last week by ornithologist, Dr Andrew Douse, speaking on the radio programme, Conservation Conversation.

Dr Douse, who is currently working on a Bio-Diversity strategy for the Falkland Islands, was reporting on the first meeting of parties to the international Agreement on the Conservation of Albatross and Petrels (ACAP) which came into force in February 2004. ACAP is an agreement which deals exclusively with the twenty-one species of albatross and a number of species of petrel and is there to help arrest the problems of major decline of all these species.

The meeting, which was also attended by Falkland Islands Deputy Governor and Director of Fisheries for South Georgia, Harriet Hall, was held last month in Hobart, Tasmania. Both Miss Hall and Dr Douse were part of the UK Delegation

The UK is a party to the Agreement and specifically at the time of the UK ratification of the Agreement, the Falkland Islands was included, along with South Georgia and the British Antarctic Territory. There are a number of species in the Falklands, like Black-browed Albatross, Giant Petrel and White-Chinned Petrel, which come under the terms of the Agreement.

Dr Douse explained to FIBS listeners that although the reasons for the decline in albatross numbers were generally understood, the decline was continuing. These birds spent much of their life on the high seas, crossing in and out of areas of national jurisdiction in their wanderings, and so the conservation effort had to be international; action by individual states was not sufficient. It was the purpose of ACAP to provide the necessary coordination of this international

The ACAP meeting lasted for five days beginning with a two-day Scientific Meeting where the action plan was agreed and the science behind it reviewed in detail. A particular, and according to Dr Douse, potentially very productive area of the action plan is related to interaction between ACAP and regional fisheries organisations. Also covered were the control of non-na-

tive species and the management of breeding sites.

The Scientific Meeting was followed by a three day formal Meeting of Parties, which brought all the parties to the Agreement together to agree a number of issues, including the budget and where the Agreement Secretariat was to be located, which had to be decided early on, according to the text of the Agree-

There are six countries which have ratified the Agreement: South Africa, Australia, Ecuador, the United Kingdom, New Zealand and Spain. All were present, except Ecuador, which had offered to host the Secretariat in the Galapagos Islands. A number of other governments were represented, some like Argentina, Brazil and France as signatories and a wide range of nongovernmental organisations.

This first ACAP gathering was, said Dr Douse, "a truly international meeting", only slightly marred for the participants from the Falkland Islands by the now almost traditional protest at their presence from the Argentine del-

ness opportunities in the Falklands. He commented, "I am delighted that the Falklands government has awarded Crude Oil and Gas Limited these licences. We are very excited about the company's prospects and my own long-term involvement with the Islands through existing business interests means that I am particularly pleased to be able to further my commitment to the region.

He added, "The Islands are a great place to work and relax and the people are both welcoming and supportive and I look forward to developing our relationships here even further over the next few years.

Lots of work, but also some Christmas cheer for Governor Pearce

MR HOWARD PEARCE CVO and his wife. Caroline left the Islands this week bound for the United Kingdom. Speaking to Corina Goss of the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station, MrPearce said that his time away would be, ...a combination of pleasure and work," but mainly the latter.

The Governor said that his principal reason for heading to Europe was that he had to attend meetings in London at the beginning of January. This being the case, he and his wife had decided to take the opportunity to spend Christmas with family and friends in the UK and to see in the New Year with Mrs Pearce's family in Holland.

Early in January, the Governor will be attending a meeting called The Leadership Conference, which brings together all of the British High Commissioners, Ambassadors and Governors from around the

world to discuss with the Foreign Secretary, other ministers and senior officials the Foreign Office's priorities and strategy.

The 2004 Leadership Conference, Mr Pearce explained, was the second such meeting to be held in London, the first being two years ago, which he had attended shortly after taking up his present post. It was, he said, a very good opportunity to take "a strategic look" at what the British Foreign Office was doing globally. There would also be an opportunity to meet col-leagues, including fellow governors and to talk to officials about "particular Falklands pre-occupations".

After the main conference, which will last for two days, there is also a conference of Latin American Heads of Mission and, while Governor Pearce admitted that a lot of the participants' pre-occupations would be different from his own, he would be attending the relevant sessions of that conference.

In his role as Commissioner for South Georgia, Mr Pearce said he will be taking advantage of his re-turn to the UK to hold the annual meeting of the South Georgia Liaison Committee. This brings together the Foreign Office, the South Georgia Government and the British Antarctic Survey to talk about management issues in South Geor-

Finally, before wishing the FIBS listeners a very happy Christmas and a very prosperous New Year, Mr Pearce said that he would be spending some more time in the Foreign Office talking to a range of officials. There will be, he said, "plenty of work" but also, he hoped "a little rest too."

Mr and Mrs Pearce will be back in the Islands in the middle of January. J Fowler (MP) Stanley



Approval for Port Harriet waste dump

AN application from the Falkland Islands Meat Company for a licence to deposit animal waste material in the sea near Beach Point, Port Harriet has been accepted with conditions.

His Excellency the Governor Mr Howard Pearce explained, "ExCo agreed that such a licence should be issued, subject to some eight conditions being met and subject also to the granting of planning permission.

Ships registration fees set - annual review to be held

EXECUTIVE Council approved a schedule of fees in connection with the registration of

The level of fees will be reviewed annually.

ExCo also approved the variation of the lease of Port Harriet Farm in order to take account of the situation created by the granting of such a licence.

Mr Pearce commented, "The effect of this licence is to identify an alternative waste disposal site some seven hundred metres from the site which was authorised by Executive Council in March of this vear.

ExCo also approved the content and format of a series of statutory and non-statutory forms and certificates required in connection with the registration of ships in the Falkland Islands.

Winter launch for highway weight limits

THE Highways (Weight Limits) Ordinance is to be brought into force before next winter.

In May this year Legislative Council passed the Highways Ordinance, however the commencement of the Ordinance was delayed in order to enable the Roads Engineer, Chief of Police and military authorities to make preparations for it to be brought in to force, in order to minimise disruption to those affected. His Excellency the Governor commented, "Sufficient time has now passed to enable the military authorities to prepare for the Ordinance to come into effect.

"Executive Council decided that the Ordinance should be brought into force before the next winter season, and it will therefore take effect from April 1, 2005.'

Permission granted for drilling programme

FALKLANDS Minerals Limited has been granted planning permission for a programme of drilling, as the next stage of its exploration for minerals in the Falkland Islands.

This follows an extensive airborne magnetic and radiometric sur-

vey of the Islands in April and May 2004. Mr Pearce commented, "The drilling programme will involve minimal disturbance to the ground in the proposed drilling locations, and is due to start in early January 2005."

'Living memorial' provides solace and comfort

IN MARCH 2000 Her Majesty the
Queen officially opened the
Falkland Islands Memorial Chapel
which was built to commemorate the
lives and sacrifice of the 255
servicemen and three Falkland
Islanders who died in the Falklands
War in 1982.

Four years on the Chapel, which is located at Pangbourne College in Berkshire, has become a truly national memorial attracting thousands of visitors each year and providing a place of solace and comfort to the bereaved families and friends and colleagues of those who were killed.

The journey to build the Chapel was neither short nor easy. In 1993 several of the Commanding Officers got together with other generous spirited people under the leadership of Admiral Sir John 'Sandy' Wood-ward to raise the then required £1million to build the Memorial Chapel. They worked through several major setbacks together with an escalating budget until 1998 when they had achieved eighty percent and build-ing began at a total cost of £2 million. By November 1999, when the families gathered in the Chapel for the Dedication Service by the Bishop of Reading, the Chapel was virtually finished and the money raised to cover its cost. The appreciation they demonstrated was palpable and unanimous.

The Chapel design is appropriately reminiscent of a ship and came about as a result of a nationwide architectural competition. Natural light flows down the walls into the

nave and gallery, which together seat 600. from a circuitous glass panel in the oblong roof and through 15ft tall window slits around its periphery walls.

The atmosphere within is both peaceful and inspiring and the eye is drawn to a magnificent centrepiece against a background of neutral colour— the Memorial Window which towers behind the altar and depicts heavy seas around the Falkland Islands with the Cross of Christ at the centre. The cost of this window which was designed by John Clark, was generously donated by the Falkland Islanders and their Government and is universally admired.

On entry to the Chapel foyer the name of each of the fallen is inscribed on large stone plaques and listed in detail in a beautifully calligraphed Memorial Book. On either side of the foyer, doors give access to matching Memorial and Education Rooms; the former contains a computer featuring the SAMA'82 Garden of Remembrance and a library of books about the events of '82, and the latter a continuous historic, interactive video loop of the 100 day war. The Chapel web site www.Falklands-chapel.org.uk - can be accessed through the Internet for a virtual tour of the building.

Other features of the Chapel include 550 matching tapestry kneelers, lovingly made by as many volunteers (some of whom live in the Islands) to a given pattern featuring the Combined Services emblem, 258 of which bear the name of one who was killed; the Memorial Garden – a

circular, enclosed structure outside the Chapel in the centre of which a fountain flows over a map of the Islands; and, still in the process of construction, a stone 'memorial caim' to which visitors from all over the world have brought stones. The caim will be 'topped out' in 2007 – 25th Anniversary year- and until then visitors are encouraged to continue contributing stones.

The Trustees are often asked why they chose to build the Memorial Chapel at Pangbourne College and the answer is simple. The College seemed a fitting location for a memorial and many Old Pangbournians served with distinction in the South Atlantic; it has maintained its Services traditions, had no existing chapel and its Governors were prepared to lease the Trust enough land on which to build the Chapel. Above all, the opportunity for the Chapel to be a 'living memorial' used regularly and looked after by the College Chaplain for its visitors, seemed to the Trustees to be a very satisfactory deal.

The Chapel Trustees must continue to raise money for the upkeep of the Chapel so that its heritage and good condition is maintained for its visitors. They are particularly grateful to anyone who organises or undertakes a sponsored event and were recently delighted to receive a huge donation of £740 from Islander Trudi Clarke who, with her friend Annie Pitaluga, undertook the demanding challenge of walking the 100 miles from North Arm to Stanley in 29.5 hours, as against an

estimated 44 hours. Trudi and her family visited the Chapel this summer to present the cheque to Captain Michael Barrow, Chairman of the Chapel Trustees who expressed his grateful appreciation and promised to feature her picture in the Chapel's Annual Spring Newsletter which has a mailing list of two thousand supporters.

People wishing to support the Chapel are also encouraged to become 'Friends' – which means giving a regular monthly, quarterly or annual gift of £25 or more. This scheme is becoming very popular and helps the Trustees to predict a level of regular income.

There are also items to buy such as Christmas cards and notelets featuring the Memorial window, and a book entitled *Just To See His Name* written by Anthony Hudson MA which tells the story of the Chapel from concept to fruition. Details of both these items can be found on the web site.



Wool report - week ending December 17 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices in New Zealand last week were slightly mixed with prices described as "firm" in Napier, but softer in Christchurch.

Australian markets also finished the week with variable results. Prices at the finer end of the micron spectrum were marginally softer, while at the broader end they were down by several pence per kilogram clean. As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide", prices were up slightly in value for fleece wool lots between 22 and 24 micron.

It is disappointing to note that wool prices have slipped quite significantly since July 2004. The magnitude of the falls during this period have been in the range of 5 to 7% for fleece wool lots between 18 and 20 micron, 4 to 9% for lots between 21 and 24 micron and 9 to 14% for lots broader than 25 micron.

Obviously such serious wool price falls will have a financial impact on Falkland Island farmers. This is particularly the case because current season price falls are on top of falls that occurred between July 2003 and July 2004

A broad range of buying interest was evident at sales last week. The leading ten wool buying firms purchased over 55% of the Australian offering of 62,700 bales, while in New Zealand five firms purchased almost 60% of the offering

In New Zealand 88% of the 16.425 bales available were sold. while in Australia 85% of the 62.769 bales available to the trade changed hands. Included in the Australian offering were 8.945 bales of crossbred wool of which 86% were sold.
