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# Loligo fee rise upsets industry

A DECISION to increase licence fees to fish for loligo squid by 20% has angered Falklands fishing companies who have accused the government (FIG) of taking more from the industry than it can sustain.

At a meeting of the Fisheries Advisory Committee held in early March, representatives of the industry said, if fees had to go up, they could advocate an increase in the region of 5 - 10%.

However, Executive Council has decided the fees will rise by 20%.

Hamish Wylie of Seafish Ltd described the increase as "extremely disappointing."

He said that although this year's first loligo season has, despite being limited to six weeks, seen duly catch levels not experienced since 2000, "...this does not justify a 20% increase in fee levels, regardless of FIG's own financial circumstances."

Mr Wylie is unhappy with the methodology supporting an increase. "...which indicates FIG can take more out of the fishery than I believe is sustainable on current performance.

"The trend of catches and prices since 2001 when my involvement began does not reflect a fishery that is capable of withstanding the endless increases in licence fees that we have endured to date. On top of this we have seen fuel more than double in the last eighteen months."

Mr Wylie called upon the government to seriously address what a reasonable level of take from the fishery is and how it will be calculated.

"The fishing business, by its very nature, operates on a cycle of profit in some years and losses in others. To take excessively from it when it is clearly past its prime is a recipe for eventual collapse.

"We need to work together to find a system that will enable the sustainability of both FIG revenues and a fishing industry; an industry which is now being expected to risk significant sums of money in aquaculture and other infrastructure developments."

Tom Blake of Red Back Consultants Ltd said the increase in fees seems to raise a question over how best to extract value from the resource - "should it be by the state or by the private sector?"

He believes the best approach for the Islands as a whole is to allow the private sector to do this. "... but a 20% increase in licence fee suggests that FIG's policy is to extract value by the state."

Drew Irvine of Argos Ltd said increasing costs at a time of uncertainty is "not a welcome development" for Falklands companies and, "...will reduce FIG tax revenues in due course."

He said it is unfortunate that the loligo fishery should be targeted in such a way, "...when it too suffers from effort cut backs and is still therefore operating in a restricted capacity.

This will be compounded by any restriction in illex fishing which will also have a negative impact on the profitability of the loligo vessels."

Penguin News asked Councillor Richard Cockwell, holder of the fisheries portfolio and member of ExCo why loligo fees had been increased by such an extent. He responded, "On all different licences there is a ratio between the fee and the income: the fee/income ratio on the loligo is such that we were persuaded a 20% increase is sustainable."

When asked if the increase was a knee jerk reaction to the poor illex season, Councillor Cockwell said this was not the case: "It has nothing to do with illex; we don't set fees based on other licences."

Fortuna Ltd Director Stuart Wallace, who attended the Fisheries Advisory Committee meeting on March 9, said he was surprised at the scale of the increase.

"We were clear we could accept an increase but 20% is too high.

"Clearly the arguments and representations made by the industry weren't listened to."

To this, Councillor Cockwell replied, "We can't expect the Advisory Committee to set licence fees.

We used not to have them in discussions on licence fees at all but I believe it is useful to have their opinions."

However he added, "We can't necessarily accept the advice of people who have financial involvement in the outcome of that decision."

Councillor Cockwell said he is keen for a working group to be established to study a bioeconomic report on the loligo industry, which was drawn up approximately two years ago.

He commented, "Hopefully we will be able to use some of the information from that report to establish fee policies."

# Rockhopper applies for open door licences

APPROVAL from the Secretary of State is to be sought for the award of two open door licences for hydrocarbons exploration.

Executive Council (ExCo) has considered an application from Rockhopper Exploration (Hydrocarbons) Ltd for two open door production licences in areas lying to the north of the Falkland Islands.

His Excellency the Governor reported that ExCo agreed the approval of the Secretary of State should be sought for the award of the two licences. "Government House has already forwarded these applications to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, and the Secretary of State's decision is now awaited."

#### Man jailed for £25 theft

A MAN has been sent to prison for a month after he stole a purse in the Globe Tavern.

In court yesterday Robert Kiddle pleaded guilty to stealing a purse belonging to barperson Beverley Lee on March 26. The purse contained £25.

The Senior Magistrate, Mrs Clare Faulds, told Mr Kiddle that he had an "unfortunate and undesirable record of offences of one variety or another."

She sentenced him to one month in prison and ordered him to pay £25 compensation to Miss Lee and £70 prosecution costs.

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#### Twenty-four hour police patrols cut for six months

FROM today, twenty-four hour police patrol cover is to be discontinued for a six month trial period.

This announcement, from the Chief Police Officer, follows a decision made by Standing Finance Committee.

Superintendent Dave Morris explained there will be a response officer on-call, "...but this will mean that there will be a delayed response to 999 calls between 2am and 8am."

He said the move is to take account of the reductions in manpower as a result of the government's target savings. The situation will be reviewed at the end of the six month period.

THE letter we published last week, from a visiting Brit who was dismayed to see rubbish dumped near the walkway to the memorials at Fitzroy, quite understandably raised the ire of the farm manager; for what the visitor saw was not thoughtlessly dumped rubbish but, quite differently, the settlement's designated dump.

Mr Eagle's initial reaction to the letter was to threaten to close off the walk to visitors and instead limit traffic to the memorials by road only. But we talked about the subject for a while and Mr Eagle himself admitted to being quite shocked, during his first visit to the settlement years ago, at the manner in which rubbish was dumped at the Fitzroy coastline. At the time he commented to the then-manager that such dumping would be unacceptable in his native New Zealand.

I too remember my first flight to the West and being taken aback by the way, close to idyllic-looking settlements, rubbish had been thrown out of sight and left to fall into the sea. While I realise now that for years this has been accepted practice for waste disposal in camp, I think most would agree

it doesn't present an attractive image.

As the outgoing Director of Falklands Conservation said in her interview with PN this week, the Falklands sells itself on its clean and green, 'at one with nature' image, but it's not backing up that message as it should. With regard to rubbish dumping, perhaps it's time we looked more closely at the alternatives.

Landfill would seem a logical step forward, I know it's not exactly the environmentally Utopian solution but, as our options for recycling are sadly limited, it must be a step in the right direction

It's an approach a small number of settlements have already taken.

Fox Bay village opened its landfill last year, abandoning its former 'over the coastline' approach, and the venture has already proven beneficial to the area; no longer does rubbish wash up from the dump onto the beachfront nor does it present such an obvious risk to wildlife

does it present such an obvious risk to wildlife.

And according to the Fox Bay Village Agent, aside from any initial cost of having a hole dug and fencing the area off, it appears the financial implications of choosing landfill over coastline dumping are minimal.

It can also work on a smaller scale. Bill Luxton informed me the other day that Chartres has had a landfill in operation for over thirty years which works in conjunction with peat cutting. He said when a bank is cut out for use, it is filled with rubbish then covered with the top soil from the next bank of peat, and so on. Simple, really.

As recycling isn't an option and we need to prevent such counterproductive waste management as throwing our rubbish seaward, perhaps the government should be actively encouraging the adoption of landfills. What do

#### Military Remains Act not for Falklands

THE United Kingdom's Protection of Military Remains Act 1986 will not be extended to the Falkland Islands.

Under the Act, the Secretary of State may designate sites in waters around the UK and international waters of the remains of warships or military aircraft.

military aircraft His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce, reported that after careful consideration at their meeting on March 22, Executive Council (ExCo) members concluded that, subject to some relatively minor amendments. "... Falkland Islands legislation was already adequate to meet these requirements, and that there was therefore no case for extending the UK legislation to the Falkland Islands."

Mr Pearce said the relevant Falkland Islands law is contained in the Protection of Wrecks Ordinance 1977. "It was agreed that some small amendments should be made to this Ordinance, and that a Bill should also be prepared to extend the legislation to the protection of designated aircraft remains." Executive Council also approved in principle the designation of an appropriate area around HMS Coventry under the Protection of Wreeks Ordinance, and that the Secretary of State should be invited to designate the sites of the RFA Sir Galahad and HMS Sheffield (both in international waters) as "protected places"

Also approved by ExCo were two Bills for remission to Legislative Council: the Falkland Islands Pension Scheme (Amendment) (Number 2) Bill, and the Firearms and Ammunition (Amendment) Bill

Mr Pearce explained, "The first implements the decision to require all new pensionable FIG employees to make contributions to the FIG pension scheme of up to 5% of basic salary. The second amends the Law to widen the category of organisations approved under the Bill, in order to make a wider range of facilities available to young people to learn the proper and safe use of firearms."

#### Haskard Rise plots sold to MPA company

TWO serviced building plots on Haskard Rise in Stanley are to be purchased by Mount Pleasant company. VT Communications The deal follows a tender process.

Executive Council has decided two plots are to be sold at a price of £30,502 and £25,502 respectively.

Also at its March 22 meeting. ExCo noted that a number of small-scale private estates or groups of houses had been constructed in Stanley by private developers but that the roads serving these houses had not hitherto been adopted by the government (FIG). The Governor reported, "ExCo agreed to a recommendation by the Director of Public Works that FIG should adopt the core

access roads to existing private housing estates within the Stanley area, where these served multiple owner-occupied housing units; should carry out urgently required basic maintenance immediately; and should, at some stage in the future and subject to budgetary restraints, upgrade the roads to agreed standards."

Also granted by ExCo was agreement in principle to a six-month extension of the current contract for the operation of Lookout Lodge based on a cost guarantee plus a management fee arrangement. Mr Pearce reported, "It was agreed that the future management of the Lodge from November 1, 2005 should be put out to public tender."

#### Moratorium on PRPs - Bill to be prepared

A BILL is to be prepared to clarify the situation when the government can impose a moratorium on the issue of permanent residence permits (PRPs).

This followed discussion at earlier meetings of ExCo of the operation of the Immigration Ordinance 1999.

His Excellency the Governor explained, "ExCo approved the text of the Immigration (Amendment) Bill which makes explicit the power to introduce such a moratorium in the event of circumstances arising which make it in the interests of the Falkland Islands to do so."

ExCo also considered a paper by the Attorney General explaining the meaning of the requirement in the Immigration Ordinance that an applicant for a permanent residence permit should demonstrate that he/ she intends permanently to reside in the Falkland Islands.

ExCo decided to amend the Ordinance to replace the existing provision with a requirement that an applicant should demonstrate that, "...he intends that, in the event of a permanent residence permit being greated to him his home or his primare."

permanent residence permit being granted to him, his home, or his principal home if he has more than one, will be in the Falkland Islands".

#### Cable and Wireless presents 'strategic vision'

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL has considered proposals from Cable and Wireless (C&W) setting out their "strategic vision for the development of telecommunications services in the Falkland Islands."

The Governor reported that members decided broadly, "...to endorse in principle the strategies and proposals put forward by C&W; to seek further consultancy advice on C&W's proposals for new tariffs; in the light of these proposals, to defer the issue of notice of C&W's monopoly under the current FIG/C&W agreement until the end of 2007 or

until such time as C&W advised Government that continued support of the Camp radio system was becoming untenable (whichever was the sooner); and to note that C&W would consider over the coming months the introduction of a meaningful regulatory regime which was not too onerous for either FIG or C&W."

Mr Pearce described these decisions as "important" which should, "... pave the way for substantial improvements in the quality of internal and international telecommunications in the Falkland Islands."

#### FLH: jobs are not in jeopardy

FALKLANDS Landholdings (FLII) employees can rest assured that their jobs are not in jeopardy according to FLH Chairman, Councillor Richard Cockwell.

Speaking to Penguin News on Wednesday, Councillor Cockwell said that an Executive Council decision still hasn't been delivered back to the Board, although it is expected in the next couple of days, following which there will be a process of talking to the employees

"At this stage, other than the fact that we may be going to be slightly more stringent than we have been, the employees are not going to find that much difference. If we make sayings at the moment we are looking at natural wastage - people coming to retirement age, people wishing to leave who we may not replace - but we are not looking at redundancies at this stage.

He added. "We have got to get

FLH up and running and at least breaking even, we have to have the employees on our side, so it is not in our interest to be upsetting them

When asked about a rumour that there is a possibility of having only one manager based at Goose Green Councillor Cockwell said. "We are looking at the possibility in the future - not today or tomorrow, but in the future. Because of improved communications instead of having two managers living in Lafonia we may cut down to one, it seems sensible. it would reduce managerial costs but we haven't made any hard and fast decisions.

"We have to make savings we have to find ways of generating money and find ways of improving our output

General Manager of FLH, Owen Summers, added that wages are a huge probably two thirds of excost. penditure

When asked about the £125,000 board members emoluments included in the Corporation's 2004 administration costs. Mr Cockwell stressed that board members do not get paid apart from travel expenses

He said. "It is an accounting procedure; that will be Greg's (Bradfield, former General Manager) final salary and may be part of Owen's (Summers, present General Manager) you can rest assured that board members don't get paid.

#### Falklands attend Miami cruise convention

THE growing Falkland Islands tourism industry has been represented at this year's Scatrade Cruise Shipping Convention, held in Miami, Florida

Margaret Williams of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board, and Debbie Summers of Sulivan Shipping made the long journey to Miami for the event, the largest international exhibition and conference serving the cruise industry

This year's convention year attracted approximately 950 exhibitors from over 100 countries, including cruise industry executives, tour operators, suppliers and tourist boards. The Convention also attracted around 35,000 visitors.

Margaret reported that two very useful days of the conference, "...provided valuable insight into the current state and development of the industry, and cruise lines' future plans.

The sessions also covered topics directly relevant to the Falkland Islands industry such as port agency and ground handling provision, the growing importance of shore excursions, and how smaller ports are competing for and catering to the everincreasing size of cruise ships.

Additionally, she said, the Convention presented the opportunity. ...to visit stands manned by tourist boards from all over the world and find out how other tourism bodies promote their destinations and manage their tourism in general; the majority of whom offered to share their information and the Tourist Board will be following these up during the winter.

Margaret said that, as well as demonstrating the Falkland Islands' commitment to its tourism industry. attendance at this event has provided many ideas as to how we can improve the quality of our service to tourists and cruise companies in the future.

#### Suspended sentences for Naafi thefts

TWO people who pleaded guilty to a total of seven charges of theft have been given suspended custodial sentences

Leslie George Clingham admitted to stealing a variety of electrical goods, five in total, while Amanda Jane Leo pleaded guilty to the theft of a video player and a TV/DVD from their employers, the Navy Army Air Force Institute (Naafi).

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds. sitting with assessors Terry Spruce and Mari McPhee said that the matter had been given serious consideration

She told Ms Leo hers was a very serious offence and involved a breach of trust, however she had suffered a "social punishment" and not had full freedom over the past month.

For each theft, Ms Leo was sen-

tenced to one month's imprisonment, suspended for one year, with the offences running concurrently

Mrs Faulds said there was less in Mr Clingham's favour as he has more of a record of previous convictions however he had also effectively suffered restriction on his liberty. She said the five offences of theft were to be "lumped" together and issued him with two three month sentences of imprisonment, suspended for 18 months, to run concurrently,

For withholding information in relation to an application for a work permit, Mrs Faulds sentenced Mr Clingham to a further three month suspended sentence.

Both are to pay prosecution costs and the stolen goods are to be returned to Naafi.

#### Not guilty plea to 'threat to kill' charge

A MAN from Mount Pleasant has pleaded not guilty to charges of threatening to kill and common assault.

However Barry Charles Yon did admit a charge of possessing a bladed

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek requested an adjournment for details of witness availability and asked that the possession of a bladed article charge be dealt with at the same time as the charges to which the defendant had pleaded not guilty

Mr Yon was released on bail under the condition that he does not contact or approach directly or indirectly any of the five named witnesses; he is to reappear in court on April 6 for a trial date to be set.

Also in court on Wednesday, a Stanley woman pleaded guilty to causing criminal damage to government property, amounting to a total of £1924.97.

Crown Counsel explained that there had been several recent traumatic events in Ms Lennie's life that had caused stress. The Senior Magistrate said that a medical report had been received directly at the court which stated that Ms Lennie had problems which were being dealt with and the adjourned the case until May 18 to allow time for a pre-sentence report to be prepared.

#### Post Office flooded after rainy Monday

CONSTRUCTION firm Morrison (Falklands) Ltd has apologised for the "inconvenience" caused after rain water leaked through the Town Hall roof on Monday night and flooded the Post Office

The roof is currently being re-

built by Morrison.

Morrison's Regional Manager, Mr Ken Mackenzie said the roof construction over the part of the building that houses the Post Office is at a "very difficult stage" which involves removal of all of the existing sheeting, including the original felt tiles and then re-felting the roof prior to fixing the new sheet roof sheeting. "This requires sub-stantial areas of the roof to be exposed to possible water ingress.

He said "Adequate measures have been taken over the past number of weeks to prevent any substantial amounts of water to penetrate the building.

However, "The measures taken on Monday night have proved to be insufficient and the heavy rainfall entered the Post Office through the floor of the hall above. Work is now being carried out to ensure that there

is no repeat of this.

The flood forced the Post Office to remain closed for a number of days. Post Master Moira Eccles said flooring throughout the Post Office had been substantially damaged, and ceiling tiles and light fit-tings had come down; however no stamp stocks were damaged and only

a small percentage of incoming packages were damaged - "we contacted the recipients who have all collected them and no one has yet come back to claim for any damage.

Mrs Eccles was hopeful the Post Office would be able to reopen at 2.00pm vesterday afternoon.

She thanked the staff of the Mineral Resources Department for allowing Post Office staff to work out of their offices and the Fire Service for the provision of their "great big water Hoover."

Mr Mackenzie said whether an insurance company becomes involved following the flood, "...is a decision that we will make after an assessment of the actual costs but responsibility will be properly addressed.

He said Morrison (Falklands) Ltd wished to apologise to Mrs Eccles and her staff, "...and to all of the general public who have been inconvenienced by this incident. "We are working very hard to complete the contract as quickly as possible.

# Your questions answered

Q HOW many road workers were on the north gang (West Falkland) this season and how many kilometres of road have they built this season? Also how many road workers there were on the south-west Falkland gang and how many kilometres of road have they built this sea-

Roads Engineer Bob Hancox provided the following information

North gang (West Falkland) numbers vary a little but for the ma-jority of the season there have been seven plant operators including the foreman plus a cook and a fitter, making a total of nine. Length of road constructed is approximately nine kilometres

South gang (West Falkland) started the season with eight plant operators including the foreman but since Christmas have been down to six plus cook and fitter. Length of road constructed is approximately ten kilometres

Direct comparisons of efficiency are very difficult to make as lengths of road constructed depend on many factors. This season in particular the team in the South had to construct six cattle grids before they could start on the road to Albemarle proper. The team in the North have worked in three different locations and had to move the accommodation camp from the Dunbar road to Little Chartres. Accurate lengths will become available once the roads have been surveyed which will be taking place in the next two to three

Q LAST year the civil service did not receive a cost of living increase due to Government cutbacks, will this be the same this year? Also, what is the current increase in the cost of living? Has the 50%+ increase in the price of petrol affected this?

A Chief Executive Chris Simpkins responded, "Whilst the preparation of the FIG budget for next year (2005/06) is now at an advanced stage, it would not be helpful to speculate on the outcome of debate on any particular issue. Government revenue from fishing licensing looks like it will not meet expectations which makes the budget preparation process every bit as difficult as last

year.
"However, councillors will be mindful of the impact of inflation. which rose by 5.6% in 2004 (3.6% of which was due to fuel price increases) and the fact that there was a pay freeze in the civil service last year, when considering the possibility and affordability of making provision for a civil service pay rise in 2005. The outcome of the deliberations is unlikely to be known until towards the end of May.

As I understand it, the Fire/ Police/Ambulance/EOD have the lawful authority to exceed the speed limit during times of emergency if they have a lawful excuse and use the blue lights and sirens. I have seen private vehicles belonging to off duty fire and police staff, who use privately fitted blue lights and use them when not in uniform and even disobey stop signs. Surely this is not legal and I can find no law on this. Can you advise? If a vehicle is left on the side of a public road with tax paid does it have to have insurance? And if not, what happens if someone hits the vehicle?

This answer was provided by Melanie Chilton. Acting Attorney General

Section 29 (1) of the Road Traf-fic Ordinance 1948 provides that a person driving in excess of the speed limit commits an offence.

However, under s.29 (4) no offence is committed if that person is a police officer driving a police vehicle, a member of the fire service driving a fire appliance or other vehicle belonging to the fire service, or an ambulance driver driving an ambulance if, in all the circumstances, the reasonable performance of his/her duty so required

There is no statutory require-ment that the blue lights and sirens must be activated for this exemption to apply or that the officers must be in uniform.

Although for example a police officer can put him or herself on duty at any time this exemption will not apply if the vehicle being driven at the relevant time is privately owned. The exemption will apply to unmarked vehicles owned by these emergency services.

With regard to the Explosives

Ordnance Detachment there is no specific exemption from the offence of speeding.

With regards to stop signs, under Regulation 9A (3) of the Traffic Signs Regulations 1999 when a vehicle is being used for fire brigade. ambulance or police purposes, and the observance of a traffic sign would be likely to hinder the vehicle's use. the requirement is that the vehicle must not proceed beyond the sign in such a manner or at such a time as is likely to cause danger to other drivers and road users.

With regard to insurance, under s.9 of the Ordinance any person who drives, or causes or permits any other person to drive, a motor vehicle on a road without there being in force a policy of insurance as may be prescribed commits an offence. fact that a vehicle is parked on the side of a road is evidence that it has been driven on a road, and therefore insurance is required even if the vehicle subsequently deteriorates to the point where it can no longer be driven.

Q Following the question in the March 24 edition of PN about warning of a tsunami which may affect the Islands, is the administration prepared to contact the US Geological Survey's National Earthquake Information Centre to enable the Falkland Islands to be notified if such a situation should occur?

A Councillor Richard Cockwell responded, "The advice we have received is that the South Atlantic is not at high risk from tsunamis and we will be discussing at General Purposes Committee whether we should be taking this further.

### Baptism: child is important End of Camp Dentistry: 'heads should roll'

IT WAS interesting to read Reverend Paul Sweeting's response to the question regarding Baptism in 'Your questions answered' PN 18 March.

An important point which was not addressed was should the circumstances of the unmarried parents change i.e. if they separate and become 'single parents', then the rules seem to change and Baptism of a child can take place at Christ Church Cathedral. What exactly is the difference? The child is still the same.

Is it not strange that the Church can modernise itself and move away from tradition to the point where both sexes, whether gay or heterosexual are now ordained priests, and could become Bishops? Therefore the Church must recognise that life itself has changed and as such there are more children born to unmarried parents than before

Having visited The Church of England website and followed the links for Life Changes and then on to Baptism, we discovered that at no stage is the marital status of a child's parents mentioned.

If the rules are set by each church council, then Christ Church Cathedral Council should realise that they are excluding children from the Church through no fault of the child, and are therefore potentially denying themselves a younger congregation of Falkland Islanders. By not baptising the children of unmarried parents, they are then effectively ostracising the parents who will be less likely to look upon the Church

The issue is that chilfavourably. dren should have a spiritual background to their lives and this should not be denied by the whim of those elected for a short time to any Coun-

Looking back through the records for 1846, 48 and 50 for the Church of England in the Falkland Islands, we note that children were baptised whether their parents were married or not. That was during the 1800's when the door was always 'open'. Now here we are in 2005 and it seems that the door is half-closed.

Leviticus 19.18 says Thou shalt not avenge, nor bear any grudge against the children of thy people. but thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself: I am the Lord.

Matthew 18.10 says Take heed that ye despise not one of these little ones; for I say unto you, That in heaven their angels do always behold the face of my Father which is in heaven.

Matthew 19, Verses 13-15: Then were there brought unto him little children, that he should put his hands on them, and pray: and the disciples rebuked them. But Jesus said, Suffer little children, and forbid them not. to come unto me: for of such is the kingdom of heaven. And he laid his hands on them, and departed thence.

How do St Mary's the Roman Catholic Church of the Falkland Islands and The Tabernacle United Free Church stand on this issue?

#### Chief Vet should recognise hydatid

WITH the Islands' position regarding hydatid cysts, if a Chief Veterinary Officer does not know what the hydatid cyst looks like or where it can be found in a carrying animal, what is he doing in the Islands anyway?

Fitzroy (Senior Veterinary Officer Steve Pointing responded, "...when cysts occur in abnormal locations (in this case "bladder cysts" occurring inside the liver rather than on the liver surface) they don't have the "typical" appearance that you would associate with them and it becomes relatively easy to mis-identify them as hydatids. Normally the two types of cysts look very different and are easy to tell apart.
"One of the problems (and it's a

good problem to have) is that because we are seeing so few hydatids these days the lab technicians (and myself) are much less familiar with hydatids than our predecessors were.

"That's one of the consequences created by the success of the hydatid eradication scheme.")

#### Reverend: a review of baptism policy is underway

FIRSTLY, I would like to thank you for this opportunity to reply to the letter from Anna King, Andrew Newman and Michelle King.

Secondly, I would like to thank Anna, Andrew and Michelle for raising the specific concern of baptism policy at the Cathedral. The original question (PN March 18) did not indicate if it was directed at a particular church, and I was therefore answering in general terms, at the request of Penguin News. However, Anna, Andrew and Michelle's letter rightly highlights the current inconsistency in policy at the Cathedral regarding unmarried parents, and that it does not match current baptism policy in the UK.

On arriving in the Islands in March 2003 I was soon aware that, as it then stood, the Cathedral Baptism Policy would need to be reviewed: however I was also aware that the Falklands suffer too much from outsiders coming in and quickly making changes that they 'suppose to be for the best. So, instead, I have taken the time to get to know the community first.

In that time it has become increasingly clear that the current policy is not only inconsistent but is also a source of frustration in the wider community.

That is why, in June 2004, I began the review of this policy with the Cathedral Council, and at our recent AGM (March 20) I indicated that we would soon be in a position to complete it. I anticipate that any changed policy should be in place within approximately two months.

An important point (that will not change in any review of policy) is that all parents (whatever their marital status) are also offered the choice of having a Thanksgiving Service instead of a Baptism - for those people who genuinely want to thank God for their child, but who do not feel ready to make a fuller faith commitment

Finally, it would be inaccurate to think that the Cathedral is unwelcoming to children - at least judging by the number of children and teenagers that we have in church on a Sunday! They come from all kinds of backgrounds, including single parent families: and not all are baptised - but they are all welcomed, and

# Conservationist's challenge to Islands government:

By Jenny Cockwell WILDLIFE charity Falklands Conservation has grown beyond recognition since Becky Ingham (pictured right) joined the organisation.

Arriving in the Falklands in August 1996 to work a season as a fisheries observer for the government, she stayed longer than planned and joined Falklands Conservation's three-person team in 1997 as Field Science Officer.

Eight years later, having moved up to the position of Director of Falklands Conservation, Becky last week handed over the reins to Grant Munro and leaves the Islands to head back to her native Norfolk next month.

When she joined Falklands Conservation in 1997, the organisation was based in the old classrooms in the Beauchene Complex and had a staff of only two others. Conservation Officer Jeremy Smith and office manager Hay Miller.

It was an interesting time for the charity with the looming threat of the first oil exploration which, environmentally, was likely to have a huge impact.

At that time, Becky says, there was a lot of tail chasing. "... because we simply didn't have any environmental data.

Companies and the government were coming to us saving. where are the important areas. what are the threats and to what species,' and at the time there just wasn't any information to answer any of the questions. So the biggest single threat in those days was the lack of baseline data.

Falklands Conservation became busy with developing proposals to fill these gaps in knowledge and trying to find funding to do that.

One of the key ways in which this was done was through the Falklands Offshore Sharing Agreement (FOSA). "They took money from all the companies who were doing exploration work around the Is-

lands and formed an environmental fund.

That fund partly paid for albatross work undertaken by Nic Huin, it paid for the Seabirds at Sea project which at that time was Richard White, Andy Black and Keith Gillam and it also paid for New Island penguin tracking.

There was an awful lot of work that filled the spaces about seabird distribution and ecology around the

She describes those early days "quite an exciting time"

Becky took over as Conservation Officer when Jeremy Smith left Falklands Conservation in 1999. In the ensuing years one project in particular has made an enormous difference to the future of seabirds in the Falklands - the Seabirds at Sea programme.

For the first three years of the project. Becky says, the emphasis was on the gathering of data -"Where are seabirds when they are not at their breeding sites in the Islands, where do they forage, where are the major areas for seabirds in Falklands waters?" This information is now readily available through publications and a database at Falklands Conserva-

When Dr Ben Sullivan joined the charity in 2001, the emphasis of the project changed to examining interaction with the fishing industry. "During 2001 we discovered the interaction with trawlers where seabirds were being killed. I think that work has led to the most significant achievement of the programme which is the production, firstly of the National Plan for fisheries to prevent mortality of seabirds and also the production and use in the fishery of trawling mitigation devices.

It has been a really active programme that has led to very positive steps being taken to prevent seabirds dying at sea.'

Last year, the Seabirds at Sea



project moved on further, with the initiation of the Albatross and Petrel Programme, which looks at the Falklands' obligations under the Bonn Convention, which is the Convention for Migratory Species. Becky explains: "Under that Convention is a specific agreement called the Agreement for Conservation of Albatross and Petrels (ACAP) which is specifically aimed at species under significant

In the Falklands those species are the Southern Giant Petrel. Black Browed Albatross and White Chinned Petrel and the programme we've got running at the moment looks to not only carrying on finding out about their ecology and threats to them, but also in protecting them on the land.

"That means making sure their breeding sites are managed and protected, making sure that fishermen, Falkland Islanders and everyone really is up to speed and educated about the threats to those species and that there are action plans in place to ensure their protection into the future.

The importance of acquiring international support cannot be underestimated. Becky says. "There is no point in anything that we do here unless it is being backed up on an international - and certainly a Patagonian shelf - level. From any conservation point of view, working with neighbours in South America has to be a huge priority.

During Becky's time with Falklands Conservation, the charity has focused on involving young people in their environment, principally through the Watch Group.

The group now has 45% of eligibility-aged children within the Islands as members and Becky says, ...it is a chance to start them off thinking in the right way about long term protection and sustainability.

However, there is no room for complacency. While she readily admits that when she first arrived in the Islands Becky was amazed at the level of environmental awareness - "people here live very close to it, whether it's the sea or the Camp or whatever, they are very much involved with the environment" - she says the Islands still fall down in a number of areas, particularly waste and sewerage treat-

"The marketing of the Falklands is almost solely based on the environment: the fisheries, wool, organic farming, tourism and future aquaculture.

"It's not good enough to say that we still have the equivalent of a blue-flag harbour; there are sixty million people living in Britain and we've got two thousand - it's a completely pointless comparison.

She says correct procedures are also needed for environmental impact assessments. "The really important thing that I think needs to happen is that they need to be carried out independently.

'At the moment there is a risk of them being done by people within departments - how independent can someone be when they work for government and government has asked them to produce a plan for something that government is going to pay for? It's just not independent.

Becky is also critical of certain aspects of the wildlife legislation that she says are failing people: "In the time that I have spent talking to people about this issue they are not actually addressing people's real issues and concerns - a good example of this is the control and management of birds of prey on farms, or egg collection.

People living in Camp have real issues with birds of prey and they really do feel that these birds need to be controlled and managed. And yet the legislation has a blanket approach which isn't flexible enough to work within a practical

But is it possible to legislate flexibly? Becky believes so: "There is a licence system so within the legislation there is supposed to be this route through that you can actually get a licence to kill these birds. But in actual fact, it takes so long that people aren't doing it.

Quite what the answer is, I don't know. I don't have an easy cure-all, but all we are having at the moment is a strict legislative system that isn't responding quickly enough to people's concerns; therefore people are getting their backs up and taking the matter into their own hands. This means that birds are still being killed, information is not being passed back and farmers feel they can't work with Conservation or Environmental Planning.

Something needs to happen but it needs to involve the people on the ground who have the problem."

More positively, Becky feels good progress has been made in a number of areas and she says the involvement in of Falklands Conservation tourism is encouraging. "Things like the production of the Visitor's Guide to the Falkland Islands (by Debbie Summers), the links we now have with the cruise ship industry and the links we have with at least four or five of the key wildlife sites (providing wardens and literature).

"We now get people who are experienced in the tourism industry actually phoning us up and asking for ideas.

I think we have proved that it is something we are not against in any way at all but, again, it is something we would like to see done in a sustainable fashion. I think that will be massively important for the Falklands in the future.

Also pleasing, Becky says, is the progress in cataloguing plants of the Falklands. "When I started there was next to nothing known about the plants of the Islands. there wasn't even a good catalogue of pictures.

We've now got the herbarium, really good photo databases, the book and atlas that have been published. All of that is held on the Geographic Information System as well so that at any one point you can pull down lists of plants that are in certain areas.

All this is good news; however Becky warns against complacency and she says conservation in the Falklands faces challenges, particularly from the oil industry, in the future.

She explains, "Last time we had the threat of exploration and we had seismic surveys and exploratory drilling. I think what you are going to have in the next ten years is real drilling and that is going to bring huge potential threats.

'I don't think they are anything that can't be got round but it's going to be the usual story of finance versus the sateguard of the environment.3

She says the Falkland Islands Government and the oil industry will have to put, "...its money where its mouth is - if it's going to shout about how great this environment is, it's going to have to pay for all of the things to ensure that it is protected throughout oil exploration phases."

She also believes challenges lie with mineral development: "Currently there is very much a laid back attitude to this; 'it's only a little trench around Lafonia' has been said to me a few times in the past couple of years. But how long is it a little trench around Lafonia before it turns into open cast mining with very real environmental impacts?

"I would say the oil and minerals industry is one that definitely needs to be strictly controlled in the future; there needs to be a real watch dog, independently reviewing what happens.

Becky says that seeking funding will be a another challenge Falklands Conservation will face into the future: "The operational level that Falklands Conservation has each month is now a large financial burden, yet the size and resources able to be generated within the Islands remains at a fairly static level.

In some ways, she says, Falklands Conservation is well set as it now attracts more funding from the United Kingdom than any other equivalent organisation in the Overseas Territories. "The Foreign and Commonwealth Office grant that we just received for the albatross and petrel programme was the biggest they've ever awarded so that means that they hold what we do in pretty high regard.

However Becky says the organisation still needs core funds and in a community of only two and a half thousand people, "that's very difficult to attract;" while she says she is grateful to the Falkland Islands Government for its financial support she also stresses, "...how important it is to keep that support going on into the future.

She pays tribute to the Trustees of Falklands Conservation and the many volunteers who give up their time and effort.

"None of the things that have been achieved over the past eight years could have been possible without all of the dedicated volunteers, Trustees and members around the Islands. They are a terrific group of people to have worked with and it has been a pleasure to work with all of them.

"Thank you to everybody."

TWO former Royal Engineers who were on board the Royal Fleet Auxiliary ship Sir Galahad when she was bombed at Fitzroy in 1982 have made a return visit to the Islands.

Julian Ennis and Paul Sinclair served with 4 Troop 9 Parachute Regiment in 1982. They were together on Sir Galahad when she was hit and they also served together in the first Gulf War.

Julian had left Paul and moved to the tank deck of Sir Galahad five minutes before she was hit. He said. "I just laid there and thought that was it. That wasn't to be and I found my way out, but I'd been badly burnt.

He was lifted off the ship by helicopter and believes he may have been sent to the field hospital at Ajax Bay - "most of it is pretty confused"

He was transferred to the hospital ship Uganda and a few days later travelled to Montevideo on the ambulance ship Herald; he ended up in the Queen Elizabeth military hospital in Woolwich. where he stayed for a couple of months. "I had 24% burns and was in hospital with Simon Weston (Welsh Guards) and quite a number of engineers - there were about six of us. I think."

Julian later married the sister in charge of his ward; he wryly commented, "...the Falklands changed by life beyond recognition.

After the Galahad was hit, Paul Sinclair escaped unhurt and ended up camped out at Fitzroy shearing shed before being moved to HMS Intrepid - "probably to get us out of the way; we were a burden because we had no kit as it had gone down on the Atlantic Conveyer" where he stayed aboard until the end of the war.

He was then part of the force which took the surrender of West Falkland.

"We then spent a few days being flown around to settlements in small groups to collect telegrams to be sent to relatives and to find out what their immediate needs were; everywhere we went people needed toilet rolls and beer."

He then headed to Stanley where he and his colleagues found their own accommodation in the old working men's club. "We stayed in Stanley until the end of July doing booby trap clearance, including at the Governor's House.

Paul first returned to the Islands in 1984 and was based in Stanley aboard one of the Coastels. "We weren't allowed into Stanley - I think the Islanders had had a gutful of us by then and there would have been a lot of friction if we had been allowed in.'

Julian now works for a company of chartered surveyors, and Paul works with the charity Mind. ....which supports people coming to the end of mental health illnesses to return to work.

The pair's decision to return to the Falklands was made after a reunion last year and they made the trip last week with sponsorship from the South Atlantic Medal Association (SAMA82).

Paul said he and Julian had been overwhelmed by their welcome in the Islands. "The people have been fantastic."

"Us young lads in 1982 never really got to speak to the adult Islanders - it was always the officers who got to, we just got to speak to the youngsters - so it has been really good this time to get to talk to

more people."

Julian said although he faces regular reminders of the war - "Because I spent time in hospital with Simon (Weston) it gets highlighted for me every time it's in the press" - he has not suffered from night-

However he said when he came back from the first Gulf War he was quite angry at the way some things had developed" and, as a consequence, "I think I probably had issues from both wars. But it's always been compounded by the fact that I never got off the Galahad in my own mind.

More happily, though, he added. .. I didn't get off - until yester-

# Farming pioneers celebrate a quarter of a century









rseshoe Bay

THE pioneers of independent sheep farming have completed a quarter of a century in the industry and say they look forward to any challenges the future may bring.

Green Patch, a Falkland Islands Company (FIC) owned farm, was originally operated as part of Fitzroy with 'outside shepherds' working from the Murrel. Green Patch. Estancia, Horseshoe Bay, and Long Island - quite a long horse ride from settlement to homestead on a Saturday afternoon and back for turn-to on a Monday morning.

In 1958 Green Patch was established as a separate farm from Fitzroy and the settlement was built.

Over the years it was not considered to be the most profitable of the FIC-owned farms on East Falkland. experiencing difficulty with maintaining stock numbers and consistently 'topped up' with animals from other farms

Jock McPhee was the only farm manager at Green Patch from 1958 to 1980 and now owns Brookfield.

lock explained how, in 1980, the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) bought Green Patch from FIC and set about subdividing and selling it off as independent farms; both FIG and FIC were "under pressure" to make changes in farming, said Jock

This was a new system and the idea of people owning and working their own land was treated with some scepticism island-wide.

However, after being vetted by a selection board consisting of Adrian Monk, Bill Luxton, Jim Clement. Brook Hardcastle, Harold Bennett and Bill Goss, six couples were informed they were to become proud landowners and they set out on what has for the majority of them become a business and a lifestyle.

Jock, having assisted with the subdivision of the area said he and his wife June opted to buy a piece of land mainly because their daughter Trudi was, "keen to farm."

Although the area now known as Brookfield had once been set up by FIG as a model farm to breed stock animals, "similar to Saladero," Jock explained, "it was disbanded after two years (1926 - 28) - I think FIG ran out of money."

When the McPhee family took over the 4,039 hectare farm there was nothing at the present settlement apart from a single chimney - a remnant from the model farm; there was not even a water source.

And so in 1981 the term 'moving house' was used literally as Trudi's bungalow was cut into sections and transported to the farm. The operation was so successful that in 1986 it was repeated with a two storey

The porches were removed from the house that was built for Jock and June in 1958 at Green Patch and the main part was jacked up, with the help of fellow farmers and friends and transported to Brookfield on large purpose-built sleds. Amazingly a bottle of 'Task Force Ale' (sponsored by the Sunday Mirror for consumption by British troops in 1982) was sitting on the kitchen table when the house left Green Patch and was still in the same position on arrival at Brookfield

Each new section was allocated one house in the settlement and as they were gradually shifted to the farms it left a rather empty settlement at Green Patch.

Glenda and Neil Watson were living in Stanley with their three children when Green Patch came up for sale. Always outdoor people they were bitten by the farming bug and made the huge decision to sell their town home to buy a farm.

Long Island cost the Watsons £19,000 to buy with their large house in the centre of Stanley only realising a price of £9.000. Money was tight said Glenda. ... but if you make up your mind to do something you get on and do it.

"Our farms are often referred to as having been cheap to buy, however there are few farms in the Falklands now that would be double the value of a large Stanley property."

Neil's approach to farming was typically relaxed. "I could ride a horse and milk a cow - no reason why I couldn't run a farm," adding with a grin. "I had to learn how to shear a sheep though.

Long Island is still run traditionally with most of the sheep work being carried out on horses: family members and friends help out with the main gathers on weekends. Glenda is notorious on these gathers for her "assertive" nature but has at no point considered giving up farming, even during the very lows of the wool prices. The Watson family have in the last few years been able to supplement their income by running tourist farm days.

The price paid for the Green Patch farms was just for land, stock and a house. The new farmers had to rent tractors, hire the shearing shed and pay so much per head for sheep in the paddocks at shearing time. However wool prices were good at the time and the (on average) 2 -3,000 sheep units were considered to be a viable operation for a family.

Peter and Maggie Goss were an entrepreneurial young couple who had spent eight years running and working a contract shearing gang. They had tried to buy land on several occasions and were thinking about leaving the Falklands for New Zealand or Australia where they hoped there would be more opportunities available.

On hearing that Maggie's childhood stomping ground was coming up for sale they successfully applied for Horseshoe Bay: In the mid-1970's the shepherd's

house at Horseshoe Bay had been shifted to Green Patch settlement, a contract which Peter Goss had applied for: his relief was evident that he had not been a part of that move as in the winter of 1981 the house that Maggie had spent 11 years of her childhood in made its way back to Horseshoe Bay. There were two derelict houses at the farm, however neither were fit to live in and Peter and Maggie lived in a small caravan until they could get one room habitable in the house. Maggie said it wasn't the most luxurious set up and recalled many evenings wrapped in a blanket as Peter and his father worked all hours to renovate the

Horseshoe Bay started out with 3.200 sheep (no hoggetts the first

quickly increased the stock by buying in from Goose Green and shifting the 1,700 they already owned and ran on Bluff Cove Mountain to their new farm. With a rotational grazing system and further subdivision of the camps, 45 in total now including paddocks, they have maintained their 90% Polwarth flock at 5.500 - 6000 for the last ten years.

Ailsa and Tony Heathman were also working in the shearing gang with Peter and Maggie when they opted for farm life and bought Estancia.

Ailsa recalled how when she had received the news that they were the owners of Estancia, Tony was on top of Mount Usborne, "...he and Peter McKay had walked up the mountain carrying a motorbike battery to be the first to talk from the mountain on two metre radios." The energetic pair had however failed to test the battery prior to departure and were not to be pioneers on the radio that day. as the battery was flat.

Ailsa was proud to recall Estancia has only ever been "in the red" once and that was because in 1982 FIC decided they wanted payment for wool freight to the UK up front and she had to borrow £700 from her parents - paid back as soon as possible after the war. She considers their situation fortunate as they were the first to benefit from the road and have since branched out into growing vegetables, (particularly carrots), and

However due to the Estancia's position in relation to the other farms who didn't benefit from the road so early Ailsa said she could "write a book," about many weekends spent out looking for travellers who were. either lost or bogged on the track. sometimes until six o'clock in the

The Heathman's two children were educated in the early days at home and, never "got away without doing their homework. I've even seen them sitting by the creek with a chopping board on their knee to rest on. doing their homework while we built a set of grates.



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## 25 years of independence for Green Patch farmers

(continued from previous page) As to changes over the years, Ailsa is sad to see signs on farm boundaries denying admission without permission. "...why should the eighty-odd of us who own land deny others the pleasure of the land?"

Terence and Carol Phillips began their farming career at Mount Kent, the only farm still operated from the original Green Patch set-

tlement.

Having been brought up in camp Terence always had a desire to own his own farm and they had tried to buy farm land elsewhere in the Falklands.

Carol recalls how, having lived in Stanley for six years, they started with nothing of use on a farm. However the pioneering spirit was alive and well within the Phillips clan and with one dog and a pup, "...we went into the unknown of the North Camp where we had never been before.

"Three of the six sections worked their farms through Green Patch for a couple of years and we had to pay FIG for each cow, calf. horse and mutton we kept in the paddocks. We also had to pay five pence per sheep to shear in the Green Patch shearing shed until such time as we could all afford to buy our own: electricity was the same price as Stanley; all these charges were looked after by the FIG overseer at Green Patch, Ray Newman.

Terence and Carol later bought the Green Patch paddocks, power house, one house and the warehouse which was converted to a shearing shed. The Green Patch shearing shed was later sold back to FIC and moved to Walker Creek.

In 1989 Terence and Carol sold Mount Kent Farm to Pat and Dan Whitney and took up farming in the Douglas area where they continue to be successful farmers at Hope Cottage.

Carol said, "All the section holders got on very well, worked together whenever help was needed and also got together on many so-

cial occasions.

Pat and Dan Whitney were at Port Louis before they decided to. "go it alone." They now have some of the finest wool in the Islands and regularly win recognition for their efforts in the annual sheep shows and the finest bale of wool competition.

The road and, particularly, 24

hour power have made huge changes for them, say Dan and Pat, who enjoy being their own bosses and the lifestyle in general! "we are the right distance from Stanley and although we will never be rich we wouldn't swap the lifestyle.

As with all the Green Patch farmers the Whitneys still use peat as their main source of fuel for heating and cooking. Although he doesn't cut his own peat now, in his heyday Pat was known to carve a massive 113 yards from the bank in one working day

The Green Patch farm closest to Stanley has remained the least accessible throughout the 25 years it has been operating - with a road not expected to reach the area until next year - and has also undergone more change of ownership than its counterparts.

The Murrel was purchased by the late Claude and Judy Molkenbuhr and Tim Miller with Claude buying the farm outright when Tim chose to try farming at Bold Cove (near Port Howard).

Claude was a reknowned horseman, doghandler and stock worker with many years' experience work-ing on West Falkland Judy and Claude passed away in 1985 and 1988 respectively.


with the farm being left to their 13-year-old son Lee. Gail Miller ran the farm for several years under the guidance of overseers Dennis Middleton and Owen Summers until Lee had finished school and travelled to Australia.

Lee chose shearing as his trade and since then Adrian and Lisa Lowe have run the farm with Lee as a "sleeping partner."

The Lowes thoroughly enjoy their lifestyle and could not imagine working for anyone else or living in Stanley. With only 2,500 sheep they have diversified into tourism to supplement their income.

The one thing that becomes very clear after speaking to all the farmers who work the land that was once Green Patch is they are all there because they love the lifestyle and are prepared to put up with a few hardships to retain their preferred way of life.

Ailsa summed up the situation; "Green Patch farmers had to paddle their own canoe or sink; there was no Department of Agriculture or FIDC (Falkland Islands Development Corporation) to help out in the early days."



# General Practice

#### Osteoarthritis - also known as 'wear and tear'

ONLY one person in fifty will escape some form of rheumatic complaint in their life!

What is osteoarthritis? Osteoarthritis (OA) is a very common joint disease. The ends of our bones are covered with a thin layer of cartilage. Cartilage is a smooth layer of gristle, which allows us to move our joints easily, and acts as a shock absorber.

The cartilage and the end of the bones are surrounded by a membrane (synovium), which produces a thick fluid, which helps to oil the surfaces and feeds the cartilage.

In OA the cartilage thins and becomes roughened, the bone underneath thickens and grows over the side of the joint. The synovium becomes a little inflamed and forms extra fluid. This can make the joint swell a bit. The capsule and ligaments may thicken and get stretched.

#### What causes it?

OA is not usually hereditary. However, there must be an inbuilt susceptibility to or protection against OA. This is why there are people who have led very similar lives, one with virtually perfect joints and the other with quite severe OA

The following factors can increase your risk of developing the condition:

☐ Stress on the joint caused by activity or aging. The 'wear and tear' factor.

☐ Previous injury and/or operation of the joint.

 Stress on the joints caused by occupation, i.e. footballer's knees, physio's thumbs, etc.

Stress on the joints caused poor posture

 Obesity. Being overweight doesn't cause arthritis but it will put extra strain on the joints.

There are probably a lot of other causes, but we do not know what they are yet.

#### Symptoms:

Stiffness in the morning or after a rest, which eases as you get moving again.

Pain, which tends to get

worse after a lot of exercise and at the end of the day. Pain tends to ease with rest.

There can be a little swelling of the joint due to fluid or the increased bone mass.

Limitation of the range of movement within the joint.

 Creaking or grinding with movement is not uncommon but usually pain free and should not stop you from moving the joint.

 Symptoms are often variable with good and bad days.

OA is most common in hips, knees, hands, feet and the spine.

#### Diagnosis

The symptoms mentioned above usually suggest the diagnosis. Your GP might decide to do a blood test to rule out other forms of arthritis.

X-rays can be helpful to confirm the diagnosis but often do not relate to the severity of symptoms. You can have really bad X-rays but experience relatively little problems.

#### Treatment

Unfortunately, at this time there is no known cure for OA but there are things that can reduce your symptoms.

Self help. Try to reduce the stress on the painful joints. Losing a few pounds won't make any difference to the damage, but it can make the pain a lot easier.

Avoid activities that are likely to cause a lot of pain. However, it is vital to stay fit and active and keep the joints moving. Move the joints through their full range at least once a day.

Heat packs, hot water bottles or a warm bath can be very sooth-

Medication. These can be painkillers, anti-inflammatories and occasionally a steroid joint injection. The best person to discuss these with is your GP.

Physiotherapy. A short course of physiotherapy can be helpful to reduce pain.

Your physiotherapist will give you home exercises to maintain your range of movement and to strengthen the muscles that support the joint.

She may also advise you on aids and appliances that make getting around or doing certain activities easier. She will tell you how to

overcome mobility problems, how to avoid overstraining the joints and talk to you about good posture

☐ Hydrotherapy. Exercising in water is generally easier than on dry land. Be careful not to overdo it, especially when you first start.

An aquarobics class can make exercise a lot more fun but let the instructor know of any problems you have.

 Surgery. Sometimes surgery is indicated if the damage is so severe it is making life very difficult and other treatments are failing to reduce the pain. Joint replacements are usually very successful and sophisticated.

The draw back is they have only a limited life span and potential complications so they are not an option to be taken lightly.

#### The positive side

OA can be painful and distressing but will not necessarily lead to a crippling arthritis and disability. You may need to alter the way you do things but it shouldn't stop you from living a full and active home and social life. OA is not contagious and won't spread through the body.

It is not always easy to stay positive, especially when you are in pain but it pays to try. Being down or depressed lowers the pain threshold.

Try and make your life as interesting as possible. Too much rest and inactivity lowers the morale, while hobbies and interest will take your mind of the symptoms.

#### NEW DRIVING LICENCE/ PROOF OF VALID INSURANCE

WITH effect from the 1st November 2004 a new style driving licence has been introduced.

All existing driving licences remain in force, however for a fee of £5 you can exchange your old licence for this new, upgraded style licence. The licence is sup-plied on security, watermarked paper and has all categories and definitions printed on the obverse. It is also possible to have your photograph imported onto this licence.

With effect from the 1st February 2004 the owner of any vehicle being licensed in the Falkland Islands must first prove that the vehicle is covered by a valid

policy of insurance. Therefore, no vehicle tax discs will be issued until valid documentation has been presented to the Licensing Bureau. This includes registering of new vehicles, change of ownership and renewals. Payments via mail will still be accepted providing a valid insurance document is included. If you wish to pay via the Standard Chartered Bank or the Government Treasury, you will be required to present your valid insurance documentation to the Licensing Bureau, Stanley Police Station, before the vehicle can be licensed.

Please note that payment of your licence fee, without presenting insurance documentation does not ensure that your licence details have been updated. This will mean that:

A tax disc cannot be issued · You are committing the offence of driving without valid

You may still receive a final reminder regardless of payment

#### Pavement pounders increase in number and shrink in size

By Sharon Marsh HAVE you noticed the growing number of people power walking and running the streets of Stanley and been inspired enough to don your trainers and hit the pavements too?

Or maybe you are still a little mystified as to why people would want to be out clocking up the miles and wearing out their knees when there is a perfectly comfortable settee strategically placed in front of the telly just screaming at you to sit down, put your feet up and watch Eastenders

Writing up the sports page is about as close as I seem to get to working out, but having seen more than just a few ladies drop a couple of clothes sizes and looking remarkably healthy for their efforts, I thought finding out what motivated them might inspire me, and possibly others, to bite the bullet and adopt a more healthy lifestyle.

A familiar pavement pounder. Jane Clement was a keen runner but because of a back injury has been unable to continue her preferred sport. She thought walking would be a good way to get fit again and spend time out doors. Although conscious of what she eats, Jane hasn't been dieting but says there are many ben-'It's a great way to shake of the cobwebs after a day in the office and even if I feel a bit tired sometimes before I set out I feel so much better afterwards.

Jane says she recommends walking to everyone and they shouldn't be put off by her and walking partner Tara Heathman's pounding of the streets as they trained for the marathon, "...you don't have to walk fast, 30-40 minutes of steady walking is just as beneficial I believe, however it can become addictive. Jane walked the marathon course in 5 hours and 58 minutes; unfortunately Tara, after 21 miles, felt sick and unable to continue she wished Jane well deciding that next year's marathon would definitely see her finish

I asked Rose Jaffray, who has succeeded in losing 2 stone and 12 pounds in the last eight months, why she started a fitness regime and she didn't beat about the bush. "I felt I was becoming a big lump of lard. My clothes didn't fit and I was getting puffed doing simple things like walking up the stairs and kicking a ball

about with the grandchildren.

Rose decided to do something about her lifestyle and on fine days left her vehicle at work and walked home. Initially it took her 15 to 20 minutes with several stops on the

After three weeks she found herself taking a longer route and now she walks for about an hour each day. She admits to being a bit of a fair weather walker so uses a health walker at home while listening to fast mu-

sic or watching telly.

Rose has dropped almost three clothes sizes and is determined to keep the weight off. It has not been easy for her, a confessed choc-a-holic who has only had two puddings in the last six months; red meat is also off the menu: fruit, veg and chicken are the order of the day with sultanas, dates and Ryvita replacing the chocolate, "...now I don't think about what I used to eat, I have more energy and generally feel fitter.

Rose's tips for others who may want to shed a few pounds: "don't try to lose weight too fast, weigh in at the hospital, they are very helpful - don't give up if you do put on a pound or two and drink lots of wa-

Sheila Stewart is another keen walker often seen burning up the miles with fellow walker Man Adams. Two years ago Sheila was walking home from her normal form of exercise, a game of darts in the pub. when one of the group commented on how much they enjoyed walking to and from the pub. Sheila said, ...since then Marj and I have walked on average five times a week all year around - normally between two and a half and four miles.

"Being cooped up in an office all day, I need and love the fresh air and the feel good factor that so many walkers have following a good walk, particularly on a fresh winter's day. While it costs nothing to walk (with the exception of a good pair of trainers), the cost of gymnasiums has nothing to do with my loathing of them. Walking has become so enjoyable it is not seen as a form of exercise or chore now but rather a fix that we must

Sheila said that after the first couple of months walking both she and Mari lost about half a stone and their, "bums and legs turned from fat to muscle.

In 2004 the energetic pair walked the half marathon in 3 hours and 20 minutes and needed about a week to recover - this year they knocked 17 minutes off their time and were back out 48 hours later.

A thirty year old mother of two. Sheila believes that walking helps her maintain her weight and says she will one day "think about dieting," to

remove any excess weight.

Sheila likes to see other walkers out, although not everybody walks all year around, "...during the winter months, Marj and I are the two wearing the luminous yellow strips over our oversized waterproof jackets doing a fine impression of lollipop

Alison Inglis, mother of two, has adopted a slightly different approach to her fitness regime. Alison has always exercised, enjoying swimming, walking and aquarobics and kept exercising throughouther pregnancies swimming a mile every day. As soon as she could after the birth of each child Alison took the pram into town each day (a three mile round-trip from her house). Three months after the birth of her second child she made a conscious decision to lose weight and visited the practice nurse at the hospital.

Alison said the advice she was given was that as she already exercised a lot the only way she would lose weight was to change her eating habits. So far she has lost 25 pounds by implementing diet changes such switching to skimmed milk and flora lite, almost cutting out yoghurt and cheese, heavily reducing red meat, and trying to get my sweet tooth under control - not very successfully, which is why I'm still overweight.

An often heard complaint in the Falklands is that it so expensive to shop and eat healthily; Alison explained that as a family they are now spending about £10 per week more on fresh foods saying. "I probably save by not buying frozen desserts."

Alison has recently taken up running because she developed an allergy to chemicals in the swimming pool which prevents her from participating in her preferred swimming and aquarobics and also, said Alison, because I was encouraged by two initiatives at the Leisure Centre over the past year. The first was the Zone Challenge which involved using all the exercise room equipment, and the second was a 5 km training programme which promised to take non-runners up to running 5 km in only 6 weeks." Alison ran her first 10 km race as part of a team of four in the marathon, raising funds for Stanley Kids Zone.

Ironically, given her rapid im-provement, Alison says, "I hate running, but according to my husband I become very grumpy if I go for more than 48 hours without exercising - I can't wait to get back in the swimming pool as soon as I can crack the allergy problem. But I do enjoy Lucy Bennett's circuits class - 5pm on a Thursday at the Leisure Centre.

Alison's top tip for others who wish to attempt a healthy lifestyle is to, "...have a large evening meal with lots of vegetables and rice/pasta/ potatoes to try to stave off the temptation to snack all evening

So, if you are still sitting on the fence, or waiting for a 'round-to-it' to arrive in the post, maybe the success stories of these women will be the shove you need in the right di-

Next time I go home with what I call 'computer shoulders' (caused entirely by poor posture. I know) I'm going to try and take a leaf out of these ladies book, put my aching shoulders back and my best foot forward in search of the feel good factor. However, should I pass the Rose Bar please don't wave, my resolve is not that strong.

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#### Wool report - week ending March 25

by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices increased in value at sales in Australia last week. Rises occurred across the entire micron spectrum, but were greatest at the finer end where increases of between 5 and 11 pence per kilogram were recorded for lots liner than 19 micron. Mid and broad micron fleece lots increased in value by between one and three pence per kilogram clean

Price increases reflected stronger demand for wool as well as slightly more favourable currency conditions for buyers. Broad buying interest was evident with the top ten buyers purchasing over 63% of the offering

In Australia 90% of the 47.174 bales available to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 5.477 bales of crossbred wool of which 90.9% was sold.

Sales resume in New Zealand next week and in South Africa and Australia in the week commencing 4th April after a short "Easter selling recess"

MEMBERS of the British Forces based in the Falklands have had a busy few weeks, in addition to the always-eventful Wireless for the Blind appeal.

Falkland Islands Patrol Vessel Dumbarton Castle has had a trip to South Georgia and has welcomed her new Commanding Officer. Lt Cdr

Andrew Stacey RN.

Captain Benjy Woolley of Media Ops said that during his time in command of Dumbarton Castle Lt Cdr Stacey will take her on. "...regular patrols around the Islands in addition to being at immediate readiness for any further tasking.

Dumbarton Castle will soon be-gin an intensive period of Operational Sea Training in order to pre-pare the Ship's Company for their

As well as making regular visits to Stanley Dumbarton Castle hopes to reach out to some of the more isolated settlements, and Captain Wooley said all on board look forward to, "...the typically warm welcome they receive from locals wher-

ever they go."
Land-based 45 Squadron Royal Engineers commanded by Major Alex Howard have proudly completed an eight kilometre stretch of road, which has given the North Arm

community access to the local area. The stretch of road was named Windy Way much to the amusement of the Squadron as their Sergeant Major's surname was Gales. Captain Woolley commented. "The project took the Squadron some ten weeks and afforded some unique engineering challenges due largely to the peat surface that it was built upon."

Major Howard had no doubt that the project would not have been completed had it not been for members of the community such as Eileen and Ian Jaffray

As for the Royal Air Force, they have also had a busy time, including a rescue at sea.

On Friday, March 18, Tiger 25 (the Search and Rescue helicopter from MPA) was scrambled to rescue a Spanish fisherman with a suspected heart attack/stroke from the fishing vessel Arnelles. 160 nautical miles North West of the Islands.
Tiger 25 was airborne and on the

riger 25 was airborne and on the way within 20 minutes closely followed by "Albert" (a C130 Hercules) providing communications relay and top cover. Captain Woolley reported, "Due to extremely poor weather and low visibility the initial direct track to the tracel. direct track to the vessel had to be abandoned and a low level alternative found. Apologies to all at Teal Inlet and Douglas Settlement

Tiger 25 reached the vessel, the

paramedic winchman was lowered on board and soon after the casualty was recovered to the aircraft for immediate transfer to hospital in Stanley

The task, including a 300 mile round trip initially in appalling weather conditions, winching a man to the deck and recovering the casualty had taken three hours from the first call.

Captain Woolley commented.
"The crew of Tiger 25 would like to express their thanks to all agencies/ personnel involved in making the rescue a success. We wish the casu-

alty a speedy recovery."

The crew of Tiger 25 consisted of Flight Lieutenant "Curly Elstow ( Aircraft Captain). Fit Lt Charlie Young (Co-Pilot). Fit Lt Dougie Larkam (Radar/Winch Operator) and Sergeant Ryan Thomas (Winch man/Paramedic.)

#### Constitutional review: looking at St Helena's relationship with the United Kingdom

By Tony Green, St Helena Consultative Poll Manager THERE are quite a few differences between the existing Constitution and the proposed one. Over the next few weeks I'll be looking at the various differences, and how these might affect you, so that by 25 May you'll have all the information you need to make your mind up and cast your

One of the important differences is how the relationship between the UK and St Helena is described.

The current relationship between St Helena and the UK, with respect to how St Helena is governed, is largely based on the values

set out in the UK's 1999 White Paper. 'Partnership for progress and prosperity', as well as practices and mutual understandings. It is the Governor's responsibility to ensure that St Helena's government is in line with these values.

The White Paper describes the relationship between the UK and its Overseas Territories as a partnership. The Heads of Agreement pro-pose that the 'Partnership Values' implied in the White Paper should be explicitly spelt out in the new Constitution.

The idea behind calling them Partnership Values' is that the peo-ple of St Helena and the people of the UK are all British Citizens, and agree on the core values underlying their relationship and the way St Helena should be governed The proposed Partnership Val-

ues are: good faith; the rule of law. Good government; sound financial management; the impartial administration of justice; the political neutrality of the St Helena Public Service; the maintenance of public order, compliance with the UK's and St Helena's international obligations; the maintenance of international peace and security, and the right of self-defence.

So what's different and how might this affect you?

The relationship between St Helena and the UK is already based on these values - what is new is the proposal that they should be spelt out in a new Constitution and that everyone in the St Helena Government should have a duty to comply with them. Provided they do so, this should mean that there will be no need for the Governor to use his powers to ensure that the island's Government is in line with these values

Next week. I'll be looking at another of the differences between the existing Constitution, and the proposed new one

## 'Best practice' approach to drilling, minerals company assures Falklands

"BEST global practice" is being implemented by the minerals exploration company carrying out drilling in Lafonia, its Chief Executive has assured

Visiting the Islands this week. Richard Linnell of Falkland Gold and Minerals Ltd (FGML) says the company's investors want the exploration process carried out "without threatening the Falklands ecology


Five of a planned twenty-three exploratory wells have so far been drilled in Lafonia

Mr Linnell said, "We know that there's gold somewhere in those rocks because we found it in the rivers, the geophysics that has been done tell us roughly where it is and we're doing more geophysics now to refine where our drilling targets should

Explaining the process which leads to mining. Mr Linnell said, if a resource is defined, once the extent is known, "...we will then work out who will be the best people to de-

'If it's a big resource, we might go direct to (large companies such as) Barrick Gold Corporation. Newmont Mining or Anglo American: if it's smaller, we'd find a suitable Canadian junior that knows how to operate that size of deposit. It is important that you have people who know what they're doing

The time scale involved from drilling to full scale mining is longer than many assume. Mr Linnell said. "We raised £10 million: that means. at the current rate of activities, we'll

probably burn that in three to three and a half years.

He said mining companies say it takes around twelve years for the process from initial identification of ground to opening a mine; here, "the earliest before any decision is even requested on a mine" he said, would be four years - "and that's a fast tracked-mine

Investors in FGML are keen to limit the impact of mining activities in the Islands, according to Mr Linnell; he says "horrible disasters" have occurred in the past around the world but, "...you just can't allow that any more."

Investors are not prepared to tolerate that sort of behaviour. For the last five years the mind set of all of the mining houses has changed to co-operating and going about this as good corporate citizens

Once you've dug a hole in the ground you can't just take it away so investors are very wary at putting a hole in the ground until they're very sure that it's a good idea

He said the assent of the community is required for mining to go ahead. "You are always going to get those who oppose development for various reasons and those that are pushing forward development and so there is naturally a point of convergence and they will have to wrestle with how to manage it.

But you won't get any investment by someone like BHP (resource company) if there was any risk of clashing with the community.

### Disappointing illex season to close two months early

COMPANIES fishing for illex in Falklands zones have been warned that the fishery is likely to close early, on April 13 or sooner. In a normal year the season would run to June 15.

Director of Fisheries. Mr John Barton, said the results from the joint research cruise this year were.

fairly clear in indicating a low biomass, and whilst there have been some conflicting signals from the commercial fishery data, it does appear to be a poor year. Hence, additional conservation action is neces-

Mr Barton said the distribution of illex this year shows that it is only marginally in Falklands zones and hence a closure in this area alone would achieve relatively little. "In order for an early closure to be effective it would need to extend to adjacent zones and we have been waiting to clarify that point."

He said he believed Argentina is

actively considering the early closure of the illex fishery in the southern part of their zone, but confirmation has not yet been received.
When asked whether foreign jig-

gers might protest at the early closure of the season Mr Barton was unsure, however he said he could understand their viewpoint that whilst there are squid being caught, even in small amounts, they would prefer to continue to fish.

They have laid out the mobilisation costs to get to the South Atlantic and unless they can generate some turnover, a number of them will experience serious financial dif-

"This is exacerbated by this being the second poor year in a row. An early closure will have significant financial consequences for the Falkland Islands as well.

"However, we still need to look to the longer term. Conservation measures taken now will improve the

probability of an illex fishery in the future, whereas no action could make any recovery much more difficult

Mr Barton said the problem still exists on the high seas where some fishing activity will continue. "Once the illex fishery closes in Falklands zones, Falkland vessels will be prohibited from catching illex on the high seas" and, where possible, other fleets will also be encouraged to cease fishing illex on the high seas

Any increased fishing activity on the high seas would clearly be unattractive and damaging in conservation terms.

Reports on the internet, indicate that permits for Argentine ves-sels to fish for illex on the high seas have been extended to April 30; if so, Mr Barton said, "...this would undermine conservation measures which could be applied in respective conservation zones.

THE inevitable time of sadness and reflection for Catholics that follows the death of the Pope also carries with it a feel of anticipation as to what the future holds for the Church and, in fact, the wider world,

For, despite his obvious eminence and monumental achievements towards world peace, such as aiding the end of communism in Eastern Europe, due to his conservative - and uncompromising - approach, John Paul II was unable to bring about changes within the Church itself which the outside world would perhaps have deemed desirable.

He was conservative in his ideas on social teaching and as a result, it could be said, he never really progressed the issues that affect so many people. He consistently gave an immovable "no" to abortion, contraception and

homosexuality and refused to moderate on these issues.

He said no to condoms, even though they could prevent the deaths of thousands in Africa, because he stuck to the line that nothing should come between the creation process and God.

In this way. I believe the standpoint of the new Pope - and the Church in general - will be tested in the future, not only as fields such as genetic engineering and stem cell research progress and popularise, but as today's Catholics try to find their way through life.

It can't be easy for modern Catholics, keen to follow their faith, who have constant guilt to contend with (although some cynics might say guilt is fundamental to the faith) - after all, who in this day and age doesn't use contraception?

The Catholic Church has said it will follow the modern world; however to truly do this would surely require changes to its doctrine - values that are based in scripture - and I find it difficult to see how this is possible.

Whether the new Pope will follow a similar route to his predecessor or instead opts to manipulate or influence those scripture-based values towards a different direction, remains to be seen.

Either way, in this fast-evolving world, it's apparent the Church has an interesting time ahead.

#### Career breaks to be encouraged

THE government needs to be more supportive of professionals requiring career breaks, was the opinion of the Education Board this

On Tuesday Dr Barry Elsby told the board of his wife's recent resignation from her job at the hospital due to an application for a career break being refused by the Chief Executive. Dr Paver has worked for the Falkland Islands Government for fifteen years.

Director of Education, Sylvia Cole was supportive of career breaks saying that people need a chance to refresh or work in a different environment to gain new experience. Councillor Jan Cheek added that there are also long term people in the Education Department who will require career breaks.

It was agreed that the matter should be taken to the Department of Human Resources for clarification.

Mrs Cole is to take a paper on Further and Higher Education Eligibility for funding to the April meeting of the General Management Team for comment before it goes to Executive Council (ExCo), however a paragraph pertaining to loans and grants will not be included in the ExCo

Further discussion and feedback from the public is needed on the subject of student loans and grants, the Board heard

Councillor Check said she had undertaken informal discussions with her colleagues who felt that a system of loan which would be "written off year by year" would be more acceptable than a straight loan. She said it would overcome the present situation of people abusing the system but would need to be flexible as students would require varying amounts of experience before returning to the Islands to work.

Also at Tuesday's meeting, Dr Barry Elsby said he felt it was "un-fortunate" that, during the recent school inspection, school managers were not invited to meet with the visiting inspectors. It was agreed that future inspections would include a meeting with managers so they could put forward parents points.

Mrs Cole said that parents had been requested to make contact with the inspectors following a letter published in Penguin News which contained "inaccurate information" pertaining to the previous inspection however she said the information was accurate for a UK inspection.

#### First case of E.coli 0157 recorded

THE first case of E.coli 0157 poisoning to be recorded in the Falklands was detected last month.

Chief Medical Officer Dr Roger Diggle told the Health Committee on Monday that this "unusual food poisoning" was normally associated with cooked meat. He said in this case, which involved a three year old child, he had "no idea where it had come from

A food history was carried out by the child's parents which could only point to frozen chicken. Chicken from the same consignment was tested but gave no indications of Ecoli.

As a result, Dr Diggle said hospital staff were "none the wiser" but, as no further cases of infection had been reported, it appeared to be an "isolated event"

He said he suspected the infected meat would have been imported from the UK however "we can't prove it."

Also at Monday's meeting. Dr Diggle warned that people should be aware of the dangers associated with asbestos in their homes

He said a planning application to change the use of premises for a food preparation business had highlighted the issue. It was discovered that the building had internal cladding which contained asbestos which, when it is drilled or disintegrates, can become harmful

Monday's meeting also heard that the process and record-keeping for assisting individuals in need of nursing, social care and home help is to be improved.

A standardised report form has been drafted to be used together by social workers and district nurses to assist them in deciding what services are appropriate for patients and to ... a more transparent and consistent approach to decision mak-

"We certainly wouldn't be able to pass on to any of the mining houses a can of worms in terms of an eco-logical problem. They won't buy into it They would do their own assessment with the community here to make sure that whatever they were going to do would be acceptable."

The government is currently drafting mining laws and Mr Linnell says FGML is "comfortable" with that legislation - "it is global best

He added. "What has to come with it are the regulations that govern its implementation. Those regulations have yet to be drafted and, in

themselves, are a big job."
He said if FGML wished to farm out to another company in future. there has to be some regulatory environment under which that farm out takes place. And then, going on to mining, that also has to be governed

"So we'll have to start interacting with the administration here to make sure the right regime is in place for everybody. We don't want to get ambushed and we don't want to put the department under pressure so that they rush their drafting.

So forward planning is the key: As there is a burn rate to money, no one wants to have to stop, and we really want to get everyone prepared so we converge on the same point in time; if changes need to happen, then everybody will be ready to handle them.

Mr Linnell paid tribute to FGML's Project Manager. Derek Reeves: "I am very thrilled with the way things have gone - we only managed to raise the money in late November and Derek was here a month later with two drills on the way. The drills arrived in February and he was drilling by March.

"I think that, considering what a remote location this is and with no tradition of mining here, everybody has pitched in and made it really suc-

He also complimented the staff at the Department of Mineral Resources, led by Director, Phyll-Rendell, who he said had been "very supportive from the beginning.

"I think that she understands what we're trying to do, she understands Derek very well and we've found that she has been able to point us in the right direction to solve a lot of our problems

#### Court news: harassment leads to restraining order

A STANLEY woman was fined and issued with a restraining order after she was found guilty of harassment in court late last week

Jeannie Paulina McKay was ordered to stay away from Michelle East after she was found guilty of harassing the woman.

The charge centred around two incidents which occurred on February 20 and 22.

The complainant alleged that on February 20 Mrs McKay had followed dangerously close behind her vehicle throughout Stanley then approached her at her home and told her to stay away from her husband.

She also alleged that on February 22 Mrs McKay deliberately drove into her car on the Two Sister's road.

The defence alleged that Mrs East had exaggerated the February 20 incident and that on February 22 it was in fact Mrs East at fault.

At the end of the two hour trial,

Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds, said she did not feel the matter was particularly serious but felt the evidence was sufficient to secure the conviction. She fined Mrs McKay £50 and imposed a restraining order upon her for one year relating to the com-

Mrs McKay was also ordered to pay prosecution costs of £70.

Trial dates set

The trial of Geneagles Corporation and Christian Henriquez Vargas is set to start on April 18 for illegal fishing charges relating to the trawler Elqui. In court on Monday, Crown Counsel Ros Cheek gave a one to two day estimate for the trial length, given the need for a translator.

On Wednesday, a date was set for the trial of Barry Charles Yon of MPA. He is accused of common assault, threatening to kill and carrying a bladed article. His trial will begin on April 24. (PN/FIBS)

#### Falklands stamps will carry correct Royal wedding date

FALKLANDS stamps are having a publicity boost, as they bear the right date of tomorrow's Royal wedding.

When Prince Charles and Mrs Parker-Bowles rescheduled their wedding following the death of the Pope, a number of commemorative products, such as tea towels, mugs, teaspoons and stamps then contained the wrong date.

Falklands production agent, Tim Underwood, aware of the possible implications of the Pontiff's funeral, reacted immediately to the breaking news of the wedding delay. Now, with the wedding date appearing on the stamps, the souvenir sheet and the First Day Covers the Postmaster. Moira Eccles, is delighted that the correct date will appear on every-

thing.
Moira said she does not know yet whether the Falkland Islands stamps will be the only ones in the world with the correct date: "It is a possibility, as many countries would have printed before the date change was announced." Royal Mail stamps will

carry the incorrect date.

Moira added, "It was a close call to ensure that the Falklands stamps will have the correct date; if we hadn't reacted immediately at least some of the stamps would have had the April 8 date.

The Royal wedding will be broad-cast on television at 1pm on Saturday. All other programmes will appear later than scheduled.

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# A tale of love, jealousy and, er, silver shoes

Review by Jenny Cockwell A HAIRY godmother, a silver trainer and a lift to the ball on a golden skateboard...

A fairy tale with a twist plays at St Mary's Hall this weekend and audiences are in for a treat.

Cinders... The True Story is this year's pantomime produced by the Falkland Islands Operatic and Dramatic Association.

Under the directorship of Jason Lewis, this David Tristram panto is an array of colour; with simple but eyecatching sets and costumes, the behind the scenes talent is clearly as accomplished as that on stage.

Taking the lead role is capable actress Frances Douse who lends the part not only a beautiful singing voice but plenty of attitude - a refreshing approach to a modern Cinderella.

Her Charming is the adorable Clovis Kilmartin who's authentic lisp makes hum an irresistible prince. The pair relate well on stage and Clovis is a natural at delivering appalling jokes.

Also praiseworthy is Robbi George who plays the Prince's minder and general right hand man. Dandini, whose only goal in life is to see the Prince married off to a girl of the right social standing, as exasperating as this task might be

Providing narration and at times somewhat disturbing flashes of legis Hairy Godmother (Richard Fogerty) whose welly boots and pink tutu compliment her somewhat ethereal manner perfectly.

And of course, where would the Cinderella story be without the evil stepmother and her daughters?

Let's tackle the 'girls' first - although you may be reluctant to do so after seeing them in action.

Dorothy (Geoff Pring) and Portia (John Farrow) - or Dotty and Potty - are frighteningly self-assured and fling themselves wholeheartedly into making Cinderella's life a mis-

Played with over-exaggerated flamboyance, the girls are deliciously

unattractive and provide a stark contrast to their naturally beautiful stepsister. (John's Potty may have been a little more attractive had she refrained from almost constantly resting her hands on her breasts...)

The girl's social climbing mummy - "What have I told you about talking to poor people? You never get rich talking to poor people." - is played perfectly by Lydda Luxton, complete with posher-than-posh attitude and accent.

She is a right bully to her husband - Cinderella's father - Baron Hardup, played by Colin Pattersson-Smith, who can never get a word in edgeways.

Cinderella's ally at Hardup Hall is Buttons, butler and general manservant to the Hardups. Ably played by crowd favourite Gary Tyrrell. Buttons is secretly in love with Cinderella and has the opportunity to sabotage her future with Prince Charming. Whether he does or not, is for the audience to discover.

Add to the production the musical abilities of Elizabeth Villalon and a group of talented youngsters in the chorus - Rhys Clifford, Bernice Hewitt, David Hewitt, Rebecca Arthur-Almond, Verity Livermore and Vicky Collier - and, all in all, this is a well-rounded and enjoyable presentation.

Rest assured. Cinderella *does* get to the ball for a dance with Charning - if in a rather unconventional fashion - and gets to try on the glass slipper, or silver trainer in this case.

Whether they all live happily ever after, however, is not for me to say: go along and find out for yourself.

## 'No looking back' for Falklands Landholdings

By Sharon Marsh AS REPORTED in Penguin News last week, the Chairman of Falklands Landholdings (FLH) says employees can rest assured their jobs are not in jeopardy.

Councillor Richard Cockwell said the intention of the Board was to make savings, find ways of generating money and ways of improving output. He also stressed that the £125,000 board members emoluments included in the Corporation's 2004 administration costs were an accounting procedure and directors did not receive any payment apart from travelling expenses.

The audit fees are "horrendous". said Councillor Cockwell when asked why the legal and professional fees for FLH are as high as £40k.

"They are way and above any government department but because we are a statutory corporation we have to go through the government audit system. This system allocates a block of the government audit to statutory corporations which are FIDC and us and we get cancd for it... we have got to get that down."

Will a lot of the savings be made outside of the farms? Councillor Cockwell is hopeful. "...we have got to make some savings outside of the farms but some of these things, because of the legal ordinance, we can't do any thing about. It's one of the problems and always has been.

Low stocking rates on Lafonia are a point of discussion within the farming community and it has been said that at a time when more money

was needed and wool prices had risen slightly the stocking rate would seem to have been at an all time low. Walker Creek is nimoured to be carrying about 15,000 sheep when it has in the past carried up to 36,000.

Both Councillor Cockwell and FLH General Manager Owen Summers doubted that the stocking rate was as low as 15,000, however they said they would have to check farm statistics to confirm.

Mr Summers explained, "One of the reasons Walker Creek is low is that, before my time, a conscious decision was made to take all the ewe flocks out of there. There has been a lot of shifting sheep in and out of Walker Creek and some of the ewe flocks in there now are not up to size, but it is going to take time to build them back up

Councillor Cockwell added. ...there were some strange decisions made in the late 90's. If it wasn't for the fact that we have been supplying animals to the abattoir our stocking rate would be a lot better than it is. Admittedly that is dry sheep.

So was it a false economy to be supplying the abattoir instead of growing wool?

Both Councillor Cockwell and Mr Summers thought not. It's all to do with economics, said Councillor Cockwell, "...if you keep a sheep that you may get £3 for in its last year when you can get £6 for the carcass. By taking that animal out of the equation you have more feed to bring the other ones on to.

Although some would say those

sheep should have been disposable or at the end of the line anyway. neither of the FLH representatives thought this the case.

The trouble is we have got an awful lot of hairy old sheep and that is why we have this problem with our wool price, we have to get these sheep out of the way," said Council-lor Cockwell. "Owen has to do a juggling match to see what these sheep are worth - ewe numbers are the real thing

Councillor Cockwell and the Chief Executive Chris Simpkins plan to visit the FLH farm managers for discussions in the next couple of weeks and will later undertake a trip to talk to all employees.

Councillor Cockwell cautioned against what he referred to as the. what you should have done approach". He added, "...we are where we are, there is only one way and He added, "...we are where that is forward - we are not looking back

However he said the workers are the ones who have to implement whatever has to be done. "... so we've got to get them onside. there is no point in driving them as they have to drive themselves. "There have got to be incentives...

"What we have to do is get the agreement so that we can actually instigate the Recovery Plan. We've only got the bare bones here, we have a lot of work to do yet. It can't be driven from in here (Stanley) we can set the policies but they are the ones who have to implement them.

What will FIG consider to be 'sat-

Councillor Cockwell replied, "We haven't actually gone down that line as yet - we have got to report back on a regular basis - they have got to see forward movement, there is no doubt about that

"The supporting part is that there are people that believe it is possible. There are other people in the community who do not believe that there is any future for Landholdings that we should just write it off and be done with it, but that would be the easiest thing for us to do as far as government is con-

However, Mr Summers added, "You have to stop and think that FIG would then be responsible for relocating the people - if locals bought it where would they go for finance? FIG.

It was agreed in Executive Council that some of FLH's surplus assets should be disposed off Councillor Cockwell said. "We are thinking of selling off some of the non agricultural assets, outside houses, islands. possibly some of the recreational needs

But wouldn't this just be a short term fix? "Yes", said Councillor Cockwell, "...but we need some cash that will go into the Draft Capital programme to actually generate the money in order to achieve our plans. You can't just swallow it up in operations expenditure.

"If we have got the cash we have to spend it on things that will actually generate money in the future.

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#### Why has FLH gone so wrong?

WHEN previously owned by the Falkland Islands Co Ltd this was a very thriving business. Unlike the small farmers, it cannot be said that Falkland Landholdings (FLH) have been burdened with huge mortgage repayments, because they were written off shortly after the Company was formed. So why has FLH gone so badly wrong?

The reason that FLH was purchased by FIG was to stop the land being potentially sold to another absentee land owner and prevent a foreign operator from passing it to

an Argentine company.

Since FLH became operational, it has been the scene of one financial disaster after another. It is very disappointing that we hear the councillors have yet again come to the financial rescue of this company. Especially when many, if not all, councillors have said that any private sector farmer who for financial difficulties cannot survive, should be let to go to the wall. I say that is the pot calling the kettle black. Given that statement, I ask on what grounds FLH received special treatment.

Since FLH is in fact declared public property, should not the public be invited to offer their views as to its future, after all successive directors and other management do not seem to know the right road to take.

Now, while I am a strong believer of keeping this large corporation as a unit, I am also aware that given the serious financial difficulties it faces, FLH is unlikely to revert back

to the FIC hey day we knew.
But I strongly believe that it is a grave mistake to yet again bail this flagging business out of difficulty. This has often been done in the past to no avail. So long as there is a weakness in the council which suggests to FLH that there is a huge money pot always available, none of the directors will be too keen to look for serious ways to correct this mess.

However there is, I believe, an alternative way out of this crisis, but it would require adopting all three of the proposed original suggestions, that is, selling some assets, leasing, and FIG financial support for these

Why not say, for example, that FLH sells Fitzroy Farm section as a complete working unit with all as-sets and staff. This farm is one success story for FLH and is a credit to the initial thinking of a former manager Mr Ron Binnie, who established the now successful horticultural business that almost equals the wool production of this section.

Of course, raising money for any would-be buyer in the Islands would be a financial nightmare as there are only two probable lenders, the bank and FIG neither of whom are likely

to offer such a mortgage Option two is to lease property throughout the corporation. There are good reasons for this now, given that there are many rented empty houses and a complete network of roads crisscrossing the property. It could be possible to offer, say, small plots from 200 acres up to a max of 1,000 which could all be allocated on the presentation of a sound ten year development plan. Such systems could work alongside the main core business of FLH and would possibly generate substantial long term revenue for the corporation.

FIG would need to assist initial funds for potential operators, because of the need for infrastructure. If small farmers can successfully diversify then I see no reason why FLH

could not do the same.

There is of course one big concern that I am sure most Islanders will agree with. That is, If FIG are so desperate to curb expenditure within Government departments, how can they justify the expenditure of the proposed recovery package that they are agreeing to? Surely this is a smack in the face to all the public servants in FIG who have tried so hard to reduce their departmental expenditure, not to mention the civil servants' wages.

There has to be serious questions asked as to why FLH has not performed as well as the private sector farmers in difficult times. What happened to accountability that councillors are so keen to promote?

If at all possible, people who write letters to Penguin News should feel able to include their name and address. The Editor should try to persuade them to do so but anonymity can be protected when justified by any one of the following reasons:

1 A threat to their job if they went public

2 A threat to their personal safety

3 A legal reason

4 Any other reason they justify either in writing or on the telephone.

The Editor must insist on knowing who wrote the letter, even if their anonymity is to be protected for any of the above reasons.

Anonymous personal attacks should not be allowed on other people. If someone wants to attack someone else (and there are always legal dangers, of course) then they should be prepared to put their name to the letter.

The Editor has to be allowed independence, and often it is the case that anonymity needs to be preserved for specifically Falklands reasons. Too often, in a small community, a letter giving a specific view on any issue will not be read impartially if the reader knows who has written it. Personal motives will be assumed and the points raised will therefore be lost.

O IS BFBS paid money by the government towards our television service? If so, how much is paid and how is the money used?

A Our thanks to Government Secretary, Peter King, for the follow-

THE Falkland Islands Government (FIG) pays an annual contribution on behalf of the civilian population of the Falkland Islands to a branch of Ministry of Defence (MoD) which has financial responsibility for the British Forces Broadcasting Service (BFBS) worldwide.

This contribution was first introduced in 1997/98 at £75k, when FIG also contributed 50% (£45k) of the cost of programme time-slip equip-ment. The contribution has increased over the years and now stands at £92,250 for 2005/06.

FIG also has an engineering support agreement with BFBS for the maintenance of TV and radio infrastructure throughout the Islands, some of which equipment is joint-owned with BFBS and some is sole FIG property.

This agreement has been in place for over ten years and is based upon the provision by FIG of a four-bed, furnished, house (or equivalent value) for the accommodation in Stanley of the BFBS Engineer in exchange for up to five days engineering support per month. Spare parts are paid for separately. FIG also pays a share of copyright payments which in 2003/04 amounted to £4646.

DEPARTMENT of Agriculture (DOA) staff had a busy three days in the run up to Good Friday with organised visits to farms and the abattoir and the annual Stud Flock Auction.

On Tuesday, March 22, a gathering of around twenty people descended upon Elephant Beach Farm where hosts Ben Berntsen and Riki Evans showed some of the alternative fencing and grazing management systems that they have on trial.

Mandy McLeod, Agricultural Adviser reported that Riki and Ben openly talked about their trials and tribulations and, "...some of the personal paradigms that they had to overcome

As most of the work is in its early stages, Mandy said, it was difficult in some areas to visibly see any improvements in the vegetation from the changes made, "but follow up visits over the next few year's should be interesting.

She said the livestock at Elephant Beach were faring "better than is usually expected for the time of year for sheep of that age class."

On Wednesday around 70 people gathered in the Goose Green shearing shed for the DOA annual National Stud Flock Auction and livestock sale, with several of the visitors arriving on the Tamar from West Falkland.

Bidding was steady and over the course of a few hours almost 100 sheep and 20 head of cattle were sold with one Cormo ram fetching a massive £1,750.

Mandy reported that the movement of sold animals at the close of sale went smoothly, with those purchased for shipment to the West being moved first to alleviate the need for the Tamar to hang around at New Haven any longer than necessary. "The Department of Agriculture would like to publicly thank Brian Aldridge and his Goose Green team for the use of the Goose Green shed and for all of the help given over the few days to make the day such a success."

On Thursday an enthusiastic

group met at the Department of Agriculture for a trip to the abattoir where farmers graded sheep for slaughter.

Everyone then travelled onward to Swan Inlet where some lower cost pasture improvement options were examined. Malcolm Ashworth was on site to demonstrate the method being trialled. which consisted of one pass with a tractor carrying a topper on the front and a direct drill on the back. planting Lotus into the newly created seedbed.

Andrez Short, owner of Swan Inlet and the host for the day, demonstrated the use of low cost electric fencing, and visitors had a chance to see his Dohne Merino lambs, the progeny of last year's Swan Inlet Embryo Transfer pro-

After a hearty lunch the group headed back to the abattoir to see how pleasing or disappointing their graded animals looked after slaughter.

Mandy explained, "This activity was to help farmers assess livestock on farm so that animals that might not 'make the grade' don't get sent to the abattoir, thus avoiding unnecessary journeys for the livestock, and disappointment for the farmer.

All in all, she said, "it was a good week for both DOA staff and farmers alike.

"Thanks go out to our farm hosts (Riki, Ben and Andrez), to Falklands Landholdings/Goose Green for letting us use the shed. and the abattoir management for accommodating our request at such a busy time.

#### March 2005: a pretty average month weather-wise

#### By the Mount Pleasant Meteorological Office

MARCH mean temperatures, rainfall and sunshine were average for the month while the mean wind speed was below average.

The mean maximum temperature for the month was 12.6C against the average of 13.1C. The highest recorded maximum temperature was 22.5C on the 3rd and the lowest maximum, 5.4C, was recorded on the 15th.

The mean minimum temperature was 5.6C, exactly the average for March. The lowest minimum temperature was 1.3C, recorded on the 9th. There were no nights with air frost and three nights with a ground frost.

Rainfall was slightly below average with 56.1mm against the average of 56.8mm. The highest daily total of 13.2mm fell on the 10th. There were 20 days with 0.1mm or more and 9 days with 1.0mm or more. There were no instances of fog during the month.

Snow fell on one day during the month, the 9th, and hail occurred on 4 days, mainly at the beginning of the month.

Total sunshine for the month was 147.5 hours, slightly below the long term average of 155.7 hours. The sunniest day was the 3rd with 12.0 hours, equalling the maximum amount in one day for March.

The mean wind speed for the month was 13.6 knots, below the average of 15.3 knots for March. There were only two days with gales (34 knots or more over a ten minute mean) during the month.

The highest gust recorded was 65 knots on the 5th. Gusts exceeding 35 knots occurred on 13 days, again less than the long term mean of 18 days.

# From Sheffield to Bucharest - with only £15 to spend

Here Nick begins a diary of his team's adventures as they attempt to travel from Sheffield to Bucharcst in seven days on £15

Saturday March 19.

One hundred and twenty of us left Sheffield, at 10.30 am. Our three man team consisted of my housemate Jimmy Hall and a friend, Chris Carter.

We got a lift as far as the Watford Gap service station with a friend (that is allowed, as it is still technically 'bumming' a lift). We had to wait there a good hour and a half, but eventually got a lift from a great fella called Steve (a lawyer from London) who took us fifty miles out of his way to the Maidenhead services, towards Dover - we asked a limo driver for a lift, but he had someone famous in the back, so surprisingly said no!

We then had a fair wait - in the sun though, so not too bad - until a nice lady (who is soon to run the London marathon) gave us a lift to Folkstone on the south coast. We then had to get a bus to Dover, which we managed to avoid paying for.

We arrived just in time to get the last ferry to Calais, at 8.00pm.


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# Swimmers excel in the pool at 2005 gala

# A med student's view on becoming a Doctor

I FIRST told people that I wanted to become a doctor at the age of five This was when I learnt that telling relatives and my parents' friends" want to be a doctor when I grow up' got me lots more pats on the head and sweeties than saying "I want to be a pop star!

As I grew up however, I realised that apart from the approval of elders, medicine had quite a lot going for it as a career. I realised that medicine would fit in extremely well with my inquisitive nature, my interest in science and outgoing sometimes extrovert personality. As a doctor. I would rarely be unem-ployed, never bored and would be able to travel around the world using my skills.

So how exactly did I get to be a medical student in her penultimate year of training? Well, it hasn't been an easy ride.

There's a lot of truth in the idea that medicine is a demanding profession- five years at university, followed by several years of postgraduate training to become a specialist.

Getting into medical school is hard - competition is fierce for the 5000 places available with some schools receiving 40 applicants per place. Apart from getting excellent grades in my GCSE and A-level examinations. I had to get work experience. For this I shadowed doctors at my local hospital and I worked as a volunteer in a hospice. I also had to show that I had interests outside of work, such as sport and school politics.

My efforts paid off. I got two places and accepted a place at Manchester University, conditional on getting grades 'AAB' in my A-levels of Biology, Chemistry and Mathematics. However the exams were tough and Chemistry went particularly badly. I was exhausted but tried to enjoy the summer.

I wasn't surprised when my grades came back and I had got a 'C' in Chemistry so I lost my place at medical school. My tutors advised me that I had two options, I could either retake my exams or I could try a different course at university.

My decision surprised everybody.

I decided that retaking my exams was a backwards step- medical schools don't really like retakers, and/or demand higher grades from

Instead I went to Southampton University to read Physiology and Pharmacology (Physiology is the study of how cells and tissues in the body work and Pharmacology is the study of how medications work in the body).

I threw myself into university life and had a fantastic time at Southampton. I enjoyed my course, but I just couldn't see myself working in a laboratory- I needed to work with people and still wanted to be a doctor Luckily, the UK government decided at that time to increase the number of medical school places and some medical schools started bringing in shorter courses designed for people who already had degrees.

I got a job working as a medical secretary in Southampton General Hospital to keep my work experience up to date. I then reapplied to four medical schools, two full fiveyear courses and two special fouryear courses.

It was a tough few months. I was juggling revision, university finals

(where I had to get Upper Second Class Honours to get a place in medical school), interviews for medical schools and research for my dissertation. Yet I seemed to thrive under the pressure.

In July 2002 I graduated from Southampton with my Upper Second Class Honours degree and two places at medical school, one at Southampton and one at Warwick Medical School, which runs a fouryear course in medicine designed for graduates of biological sciences like myself. I decided that it was time for a change of scene and headed to Warwick

Time has flown by since starting at Warwick in September 2002. The medical school is very close-knit with a big emphasis on teamwork, a very important part of being a doctor. The training has been gruelling and demoralising in places, but the satisfaction of using my knowledge and skills to help patients makes up for

The first eighteen months of the course is mostly based in university but with regular patient contact. After eighteen months teaching moves to the hospitals for the remainder of the four years with a six-week period of self-organised teaching after a year, the 'elective', which can be anywhere in the world.

I haven't been disappointed in my choice to come to KEMH for my elective- everybody - doctors. staff and patients - have welcomed me with open arms and taught me so much

When I return to Warwick I'll have a much stronger base of skills and a great deal more confidence in

#### Freezing recipes for the Falklands -Luxury Fish Pie

Ingredients

70g butter 40g plain flour

300ml dry white wine

150ml double cream

2 tbsp fresh parsley, chopped 2.25kg potatoes, peeled and

chopped 550kg salmon fillet, skinned and

cut into 2.5cm pieces 350g white fish, skinned and cut

into 2.5cm pieces 55g grated Parmesan cheese

Melt 40g of the butter in a large saucepan and stir in the flour. Cook, stirring over a gentle heat for 1 min. Remove from heat and gradually whisk in 300ml water and the wine until smooth. Return to the heat and gradually bring to the boil, whisking until thickened.

Stir in the cream and season well, then add the parsley. Cover with clingfilm, to prevent a skin from forming; leave to cool completely. Meanwhile, boil and mash the potatoes, using the remaining butter in the mash.


Mix the fish together and place in a large ovenproof dish. Pour over the watercress sauce.

Using two large spoons, shape the mashed potato into ovals. Use the ovals to cover the fish and sauce. Scatter with the Parmesan cheese. Can now be frozen for up to two months, covered with clingfilm.

To serve, thaw the pie at room temperature for 2-3 hours then cook in an oven preheated to Gas 4 for 40 mins or until the potato is golden brown and the sauce is bub-



In third place was Gareth Goodwin's team Christian Berntsen and Gerald Cheek with 281,20v. Four possibles (35 out of 35) were recorded in the team shoot Mike and Derek P had one each and Gareth two. Gareth also equalled the range record of 104.

# Uruguayan Fisheries Department in the spotlight

A CONTROVERSY involving scientific observers on board Uruguayan flagged high seas fishing vessels became public this week in Montevideo following claims of payment contract breach and working conditions disregard in 2003 and 2004.

Among the vessels mentioned as having been involved in the "irregularities" is Elqui, the trawler currently being held in Stanley.

In a full page interview in a Montevideo daily, the wife of one of the scientific observers claims that contrary to International Labour Organisation accords, signed by Uruguay, the Uruguayan Fisheries Department, Dinara, unilaterally decided in 2003 to cut their per diem compensation from the established 85 US dollars to less than 35 US dol-

Furthermore from October 2003 to July 2004 scientific pay cheques' did not include social security deductions which are mandatory under Uruguayan law.

Regarding working conditions. apparently the Uruguayan Fisheries Department, Dinara, also tried to drastically cut the number of observers by only having them on board vessels holders of licences C and D which are basically those operating in high seas

According to Fabiana Terrenoire. Dinara's argument was that with the introduction of the VMS satellite tracking system, "observers were no longer needed.

However, "It's easy to change the coordinates' information and actively send the wrong message. This was proved by the Viarsa I and the Maya V caught red handed poaching in jurisdictional waters." points out Ms Terrenoire

Ms Terrenoire added that to definitively push aside the "80 professional" scientific observers. Captain Yamandú Flangini who was Director of Dinara, created the figure of "contracted scientific observer" with a "minimal instruction.

Most recruits were from the Uruguayan Navy, but during the Fiarsa 1 incident, which was chased for weeks by several countries fisheries patrol vessels, the Uruguayan Navy command banned all naval personnel from fishing vessels fearing international complications.

### Argentine govvernment justifies Kirchner's skipping Pope's burial

ARGENTINE president, Nestor Kirchner is to stay away from the Pope's funeral

An Argentine delegation will attend the burial at the Vatican and includes Vice-President Daniel Scioli. Foreign Minister Rafael Bielsa. Cults Secretary Guillermo Oliveri and Argentine Ambassador to the Vatican Carlos Custer.

Scioli said that Kirchner was "deeply moved" by the pope's death and that "no other interpretation should be made" of his absence, the Buenos Aires Herald reports.

The pope visited Argentina in 1982 and 1987 and many Argentine

officials credit him with having avoided a war Chile in 1978-9 by sending in mediator Cardinal Antonio Samoré when the two countries were on the brink of an armed conflict.

The Foreign Ministry said that of the Southern American presidents only those of Bolivia (Carlos Mesa). Ecuador (Lucio Gutiérrez) and Brazil (Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva) will attend.

Custer also justified Kirchner's absence, saving that the delegation he was sending to the funeral "was not low-ranking" and neither was the official presence at a mass in Buenos Aires Cathedral downtown on Monday evening when Buenos Aires Cardinal-Archbishop Jorge Bergoglio tipped as a possible pope fered a mass for the eternal rest of the Pope

Kirchner has been at loggerheads with the influential Catholic church since he took office in May, 2003, mainly in what many see as a biased persecution of military men who violated human rights during the 1976-1983 dictatorship, and his nomination of a pro-choice judge (Carmen Argibay) to the Supreme Court. Kirchner was criticized by both his own allies as well as the opposition

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

# Desire aspires to summer drilling

OIL company Desire Petroleum ple hopes to start exploratory drilling in the Falklands next summer, possibly as early as December 2005.

That's according to the company's Chairman, Dr Colin Phipps, who is visiting the Islands this week with Desire's Chief Executive Officer, Mr Ian Duncan.

Speaking to Penguin News on Wednesday, Dr Phipps said the £25 million raised by Desire earlier this year allows the company enough money, "...to drill three wells at current costs.

The wells will test the three principal targets identified through a 3D seismic survey and Dr Phipps says the company is feeling confident: "I can't tell you if there's going to be oil but certainly we're a

lot nearer to it.

Dr Phipps says Desire could be drilling as early as December 2005, however this depends on a number of factors; first and foremost, the company needs to secure the use of a rig - "that's the crucial bit "

He says tenders have been sent out and, "...we're talking to a number of drilling contractors about rig availability

In addition, the company needs to fulfil a number of obligations including environmental studies and Health and Safety Executive requirements, a process he says. with a fair wind, we can do in about six months.

The earliest we can drill from now is in the late spring, but it is much more likely to be mid-sum-

Dr Phipps says each of the three wells is on "a very large prospect" and if one is successful, "...it will make a very big difference to the Falkland Islands

Accompanying Dr Phipps and Mr Duncan on this visit is Mr Bob Lyons of Peak Well Management. the company appointed by Desire to carry out well design and drilling project management

This will involve detailed well and test design, contracting for all services and execution of the drilling programme, including materials and logistics.

Mr Lyons is here this week to see what resources can be found locally: "We want to use as many local facilities as possible. Primarily what we will be looking to draw upon locally is logistical support.

Shore-based activity? Should sufficient oil be found for development, Dr Phipps says the process will then enter into a period of "pretty deep discussions with the Councillors, Governor and, indeed, everyone on the Islands as to what they want to happen. In the end it's your choice.

He added. "There will obviously need to be some infrastructure here, there will have to be supplies and so forth, and, given Argentina's attitude, it's going to be essential that there is some here.

But the extent to which it will change the Islands is a matter for you rather than for us.

Dr Phipps is complimentary of the work of Director of Mineral Resources, Phyl Rendell, and Dr Phil Richards of the British Geological Survey who he says have. really represented the interests of Islanders.

☐ Desire holds a 100% interest in 3,650 km2 in the North Falkland Basin. These interests are in Tranches C,D,I and L.

Desire also holds a 12.5% interest in Tranche F, operated by Talisman Energy. Six wells were drilled in this basin in 1998. Five recorded oil or oil and gas shows.

In February, Rockhopper Exploration announced it had signed an agreement with Desire to farm-in to the three wells to be drilled by Desire in Tranches C and D.



WITH oil exploration once again looming on the horizon, debate will inevitably resume about whether any future oil operations should be shore-based or not.

Back in 1998, just as the first exploratory wells were being drilled, public meetings (and the *Penguin News* letters page) came alive with diametrically opposed, but equally fervent - and valid - arguments.

One side warned of the damage to the Falklands' "way of life" shorebased production could inflict whereas others urged the community to open its eyes to the economic benefits allowing such activity could promote.

It was an expectant and emotive time but one which, as it turned out, ended with more of a hush than a gush of the black stuff.

And so, here we go again - as the impetus grows towards the arrival of another rig, it's likely both sides will prepare themselves for the fight.

Or will they?

Back then, we had confidence in our illex fishery and, to many, a financial future without oil looked secure. Now that security is diminished; confidence has been replaced by wishful longing. Will that alter the arguments?

With our economic outlook nowhere as rosy as it was in 1998 will people be more willing to embrace oil? Or will they stick to their guns and insist Islanders should place a higher importance on lifestyle and environment than money?

In 1998, calls came for a referendum to be held to determine exactly how people wanted the oil game to be played. This time there should be no need.

For we just so happen to have an election due very close to the provisional start date for drilling.

Voters will have the ideal chance to tell prospective councillors exactly what they want and to elect the candidates who have the 'right' view of the future.

Equally, perhaps it is time for those of you with strong views on the future of oil in the Falklands to consider standing for election?

The four years which follow polling night could be some of the most consequential the Islands ever face. The timing of the election presents the ideal opportunity for action, not just words.

# Rams bound for remote Tristan



FOUR Falklands rams left the Islands this week, bound for a remote new home.

The animals, from the National Stud Flock, are bound for the remote island of Tristan da Cunha.

Senior Veterinary Officer. Mr Steve Pointing, said the opportunity of sending the rams came about because the Falkland Islands Company's charter ship Marianne Danica is visiting Tristan da Cunha to collect cargo. "The Administrator in Tristan da Cunha made contact with the Department of Agriculture to ask if it would be possible to send some rams over on this vessel."

The rams are not a gift from the Falklands to Tristan. The Administrator's request coincided with the Ram Sale held at Goose Green this year so Neil Judd from the Department of Agriculture selected four big, well grown, clean faced shearling Corriedale rams.

They were sold at the reserve price of £30 per head and a bill for £120 plus other costs will be sent to the Administrator in Tristan da Cunha in due course.

When asked why Corriedales are a good choice for Tristan, Mr Pointing said the choice at the ram sale was either Corriedales or Polwarths. "On Tristan da Cunha sheep are kept mainly for meat production rather than wool so Corriedales were considered to be

the preferred option of the two breeds available."

He said the rams chosen were above average liveweight for their age (around 70kg), had medium quality wool (around 25 micron), "...and should prove to be easy care

with high fertility."

He added, "Credit should be given to Brian Aldridge of Goose Green for presenting these rams in such good condition."

The sheep will mainly be used for breeding with the aim of meat production but. Mr Pointing said, "if these rams are crossed with the breeds already present on Tristan da Cunha (mainly Scottish Blackface and Cheviots) then the

progeny will have considerably finer

wool than either of the parent Brit-

ish breeds "

Mr Pointing thanked Roger Spink at the Falkland Islands Company and the captain of Marianne Danica for agreeing to carry the rams to Tristan: "It is a very nice gesture to an island that is considerably more isolated than the Falkland Islands."

Marianne Danica sailed from Stanley on Tuesday morning and is due to reach Tristan da Cunha next Wednesday or Thursday.

Mr Pointing assured the rams are travelling in a purpose built crate and have access to water, hay and sheep nuts at all times.

## Trio charged after alleged 'severe' assault

THREE men have appeared in count facing charges which followed a series of incidents, including the serious assault of a fourth man, which occurred earlier this month.

In court on Friday, April 8, were Falkland Islanders Ryan Hawksworth and Andrew MacDonald, who each face charges of affray and violent disorder, and military fireman Christopher Saunders. Mr Saunders faces a charge of violent disorder and, more seriously, a charge of grievous bodily harm.

The men entered no pleas to the charges.

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek asked that the cases be adjourned as it was likely further charges would be laid in relation to the events which took place on April 4

She said the charges relate to a number of incidents, including one outside the Globe Tavern and one outside Michele's Cafe.

Ms Cheek alleged that when events moved to outside Michele's Cafe, they "increased in severity considerably" and serious injuries were caused to a local man.

Senior Magistrate, Mrs Clare Faulds, adjourned the case until

April 20.

All three men were released on conditional bail; they are subject to a curfew and are banned from licenced premises.

# Illegal for under 16's to smoke | A rockin' good way to tie the knot

PARENTS who are under the misconception that their children can legally smoke with their permission are breaking the law.

A spokesperson for the Royal Falkland Islands Police said they have become aware that a number of parents are under the impression that they are able to allow their children, under the age of sixteen years, to smoke and use tobacco, with their permission or within their

However, Sergeant Dave Roberts points out that Section 90(2) of the Licensing Ordinance states that "It is unlawful for any person under sixteen to consume tobacco, whether by smoking or chewing it, or in any other way.

This means that a person under sixteen years of age commits an offence if he consumes tobacco at any time and in any location.

The section provides a penalty up to the maximum of Level 2 on the standard scale, which at present stands at £350.00

Sergeant Roberts said, any person supplying a person who is under sixteen years of age with tobacco is aiding the commission of that offence and may be prosecuted for so doing. This would include parents or guardians.

He added, "It is also worthy of note that Section 90(4) of the Licensing Ordinance states:

"A police officer may, with the use only of such force as may be reasonably necessary in the circumstances of the case, seize any tobacco which he finds in the possession in a street or other public place of a person he reasonably suspects to be under sixteen, and shall deliver any tobacco so seized to, or as may be directed by, the chief police officer.

He added."For clarity, cigarettes, cigars and all such items which contain tobacco and are produced to enable the consumption of that tobacco may be seized.

However the group were not to have a trouble free journey; Stanley Anderson suffered an ankle injury just before Mount Pleasant and had to drop out; Katrina was suffering with both her feet and legs and also had to leave the group for a while. She was back on the road again as they neared Mount Harriet and completed the walk into Stanley. was in a lot of pain," said Paul

Paul himself was suffering the onset of hypothermia and was moved to the support vehicle for ten miles but after a warm up was back on the road as they neared Fitzroy; he said he was very disappointed not to have completed the challenge. Marvyn and Falkland covered the entire 60 miles, with Falkland tirelessly stopping vehicles for donations through-

Twenty-three and a half hours after setting off they arrived in Stanley having received a lot of support along the road and £530 in donations from passers by

With their sponsorship money the group are hopeful that they will raise £2,000 in total

So, how did they feel after their adventure? "There was nobody out dancing on Saturday night," said Paul.

The scouts would like to produce 500 covers of each set of cachets, to be sold with all profits going to the Scouts Expedition Fund.

Cable and Wireless have donated the envelopes and scouts have already started to journey round the West on the hunt for rubber stamps. Soon the hunt will start on the East, and in Stanley.

Leif said, "If you would like to add your cachet to what is after all a free advertising scheme, we would love to hear from you.

# Scientists seek answers to climate questions

HAVE the Falklands always had the same climate? How has sea level varied naturally over the last several thousand years since the last ice age?

These are the questions that a team of visiting research scientists have set out to answer.

Professor Antony Long, Dr Mike Bentley and Dr Rob Scaife from the Universities of Durham and Southampton have spent a week carrying out geological field-work in the Islands, supported in part by a grant from the Shackleton Fund

They have been coring peat bogs, studying coastal peat sections and taking samples back to the UK for laboratory analysis. Their aim is to analyse the peat and sediments for the fossil pollen contained within it

Careful identification of the pollen will be able to demonstrate what climatically-driven changes in vegetation assemblages there have been during the last several thousand years in the islands.

Antony Long said. "We've found some fantastic thicknesses of peat, in places preserving material from over 15,000 years ago. We're confident that we can extract an excellent record of climate change in the islands from the microscopic pollen in these peats.

The preservation in the peat is astounding - even just looking at our samples in the field it is possible to see plant remains that are very different to those found today. This suggests that there have been major changes in climate in the past that are well preserved in the Falkland Island peats.

Studying these changes will help fill an important gap in our understanding of how and why cli-

mate has changed in the Southern Hemisphere

The second question of sea level change has proved more subtle. As the great ice sheets melted at the close of the last ice age (about 18,000 years ago) global sea level rose by over 100 metres.

But sea level didn't change at the same rate in the same way everywhere - for example in places such as Chile where the Andes are still uplifting this means that the land is rising and so sea level may not have risen so fast in these ar-

Similarly, in places where there were (or still are) ice sheets the weight of ice can cause uplift or subsidence of the earth's crust and so complicate the record of sea level.

The team chose to study the

Falklands because they are confident that the record of sea level change here is sufficiently far from the Andes and from the Patagonian ice caps so that it will not be complicated by these factors

Dr Bentley commented before he left, "We have been delighted to find some excellent coastal exposures where we have been able to study the change in sea level over the past few thousand years.

We've also sunk some small cores to retrieve more deeply buried sediments. We're hopeful that our laboratory analyses will pin down the timing and rate of past sea level change

The team hope to return to the Islands for further work once the initial analyses have been com-

tomorrow's show. Jo Morrison of the RBA says, with the recent Al and ET programmes ...these entries will be some of the best animals in the islands, so competition will be fierce.

Judging begins at 11am and will be followed by an auction of nine sheep - five stud flock ewe hoggets from Mount Kent and 4 Texel rams from Fitzroy.

The event will be rounded off by prize giving with awards being presented by His Excellency the Governor Mr Howard Pearce.

There are the usual fun categories at the show: guess the weight of the sheep, guess the weight and micron of the fleece (so all those people who have recently completed the wool classing course will be able to test their skills), and choosing the name of the champion ram and champion ewe.

THE firm commitments made by licensees to seismic or drilling work that form part of a license approval should no longer confidential, the Mineral Resources Committee has decided.

Public license commitments

The UK's Department of Trade and Industry now publishes this information once a license is awarded, and the committee decided last week a recommendation should go to Ex-ecutive Council that the Falklands also does this.

Councillor Stephen Luxton explained that publishing this information will enable prospective explorers to see what level they should be

"We hope it will encourage more robust applications in the future, as currently anybody who is bidding for a new license has no idea of what has been considered an acceptable work programme for other licensees, and a great deal of time is spent by British Geological Survey explaining the level at which a licensee should be aiming with their application, information which would be self-explanatory if other approved work programmes were available for viewing."

Items discussed at the closed part of the meeting were future policy on open-door licensing, future re-quirements for a Health and Safety consultancy, and a general update on activity on and offshore.

## New - but old-style - look for historic Stanley building

THE Old Central Store in Stanley's dockyard is undergoing a face-lift.

The Store was built in the summer of 1843/44 and was one of the first buildings to be constructed on the site of the new town of Stanley.

Archivist Jane Cameron says it is probably the oldest surviving wooden building in the whole of southern South America, as Patagonia had not been settled by Europeans at that date.

Until a few years ago the Central Store was still used for its original purpose and remained largely as described in the Government Buildings Book of 1855: "This is a strongly framed wooden building of two storeys and a loft undivided, 70 feet long by 30 feet wide. Ladders for communicating with the upper storeys, counters and shelves for the various stores, and machinery for hoisting packages are the only fittings ...

Some internal alterations were made about five years ago to accommodate offices for the Public Works Department but, Jane says, disturbance to the main structure was minimised, so that the building could easily be returned to its original layout.

'Most of the important internal features remain - the trapdoors and block and tackle ' for hoisting packages' - the massive pillars of timber on the ground floor - the rows of brass numbers let into the wooden boards of the first floor, for measuring lengths of ships'

"Surprisingly, the roof was originally 'Galvanised iron', an early use of this newly-invented material.

The old shingles, when analysed, were found to be manio wood from Chile. Jane says, "They have lasted extraordinarily well, only failing now because they were attached with iron nails which have rusted and split the wood.'

The new shingles (more properly known as 'shakes', because they are hand split, which gives the characteristic uneven finish) are made of Canadian red cedar and were imported from Britain.

Because of the historic significance of the building it was originally hoped that replacements could be obtained from Chile, but the necessary fire-retardant treatments were not available from this source," Jane says.

The new shakes are being attached with stainless steel nails, so that the old problem with rusting will not re-occur.

The shakes were paid for from Historic Buildings funding and the work of replacement is being carried out in association with the Public Works Department.

Rob Yssel and Colin Browning are placing the new shakes on the building while the PWD's Property and Municipal Section is working to replace the building's windows and staircase.

In the future it is planned that the Museum will be re-located to the Dockyard, so that the Old Central Store, along with the other historic structures which surround it, can become a focus for visitors to Stanley and, as Jane says, "...these buildings can be appreciated as they deserve."

# 150+ object to new housing

YOUR report 'Racecourse housing deferred' in *Penguin News* April 8, in which it was stated that, 'Letters of objection to the development were received from seven members of the public', does not truly reflect the strength of feeling against Govemment's application to build eleven houses in the Racecourse area.

I am aware that Owen Summers, Chairman of the Stanley Sports Association (SSA), wrote on behalf of SSA officials, jockeys and horse owners, which must number 50-60 per-

sons in total.

As Chairman of the Falkland Islands Overseas Games Association, I consulted my Vice-Chairman and several Committee members, before submitting FIOGA's objections. We have nine Associate Member Clubs and organisations within FIOGA, of which the Football Club alone has 80 members, while the Golf, Swimming, Shooting Clubs etc. also have considerable membership

My conservative estimate is that there are at least 150 people, not just seven, who object to developing the Racecourse site for housing. It is therefore somewhat surprising that the Planning and Building Commit-tee have asked that, 'a plan be produced for the development of the whole area

Councillor Cockwell's encouraging quote that. 'Members were concerned about the effect...on the operation of the Racecourse itself gives some hope that access for horses to and from the main course will be maintained.

Horse racing began on the present racecourse in 1909 and it would be tragic should housing development prevent the 100th anniversary meeting from taking place



Q ARE there any Masonic Lodges in the Islands?

As they are no longer "secret societies" but "societies with secrets", perhaps the general public could be told where they meet?

Do holders of Public Office and / or civil servants have to declare their membership?

A The following response was kindly provided by Mr Pete King, Government Secretary.

THERE is no legal requirement to register societies in the Falkland Islands. The existence of a Masonic Lodge in the Falkland Islands can therefore only be formally confirmed directly through any such lodge or its members.

Government staff are only required to complete a "Business Interests Questionnaire" declaring, for example, part-time jobs, retailing activities, or involvement in companies or partnerships. For informa-tion, the Falkland Islands Constitution Order provides in section 11 for the protection of freedom of assembly and association, as follows:

11.(1) Except with his own consent, no person shall be hindered in the enjoyment of his freedom of peaceful assembly and association. that is to say, his right peacefully to assemble freely and associate with other persons and in particular to form or belong to trade unions or other associations for the promotion and protection of his interests.

(2) Nothing contained in or done under the authority of any law shall be held to be inconsistent with or in contravention of this section to the extent that the law in question makes provision-

(a) that is reasonably required: (i) in the interests of defence, internal security, public order, public morality or public health; or (ii) for the purpose of protecting the rights or freedoms of other persons;

(b) that imposes restrictions upon public officers that are reason-

ably required for the proper performance of their functions, except so far as that provision or, as the case may be, the thing done under the authority thereof is shown not to be reasonably justifiable in a democratic society.

Q HOW many policemen or firemen jobs does a 1% rise in the total Falkland Islands Government (FIG) wage bill equate

 ${f A}$  Deputy Financial Secretary, Keith Padgett provided the following answer.

THE total FIG salaries and wages budget for the current year amounts to just under £15M.

Police constables and firemen are paid on grade F, the mid-point of which is £17,000 pa. After taking account of pension contributions and overtime, the total direct cost of employing an extra member of staff is around £20,000 (This excludes any recruitment, contract or passage

costs that could be involved). An additional 1% rise in the FIG salaries and wages bill would therefore theoretically allow 7.5 additional police constables or firemen to be appointed.

However. should be noted that all government services have been affected by the recent reductions in fishing licence revenue and there are many other areas where the budget (and staffing) has been reduced. Based on the recent discussions on the budget, there would be many desirable areas for budget reinstatement if an additional £150,000 could be made avail-

It is also perhaps interesting to note that, because fishing licence income funds a large part of the overall budget, a 1% increase in FIG's salaries and wages budget is equivalent to a 5% increase in income tax.

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# From Sheffield to Bucharest on only £15

CONCLUDING the diary of Falklands student Nick Rendell as he takes part in his university's annual sponsored hitch hike, or bummit', for charity.

This year, funds were raised for Children of Chernobyl, Romanian Orphan Relief and Save the

Rainforests

We catch up with him in Belgium MONDAY morning, up for breakfast and away by 7am. Have a nightmare on the buses, and get lost in the suburbs to the north of the city. About 25 degrees too - so not much fun hiking through residential areas with heavy ruck sacks.

Eventually get a lift off a nice middle-aged woman from a small petrol station, who takes us to a slip road to the main motorway towards

Germany

Immediately picked up by an amazing 70-year-old professor who regularly lectures in Romania on the fall of communism. He speaks seven languages, has two dental practises and still studies at New York University; you never stop learning!

He gives us some tips for Romania, but has to drop us fairly soon at some services. Here we get a lift off a Belgian local TV presenter, Stefanie. On another 50kms, where a German lady takes us in her 4X4 to a slip road off a large service sta-

Here we are picked up by a great lorry driver, who tells us stories about his trips to London and Scotland in the 1960s. "Is Carnabie Street still a

crazy place to be?"

Dropped at some services about 100 yards from the German border, where we see lots of Czech lorries (hoping one might take us to Prague or Pilsen - our aim for Tuesday evening). No such luc.k and after three hours we decide to wander over the border (in fact we wander back and forth for a laugh; technically I've visited Germany and Belgium 20 times each!)

Within 15 minutes we have a lift all the way to Frankfurt - 200km or so! Bernhard is a great fella, and we talk about the British Royal family, German politics, and even Zee War! As the sun sets we drive through the impressive Eiffel mountain range, with steep mountains, deep ravines and the occasional castle

He drops us outside Frankfurt at about 8.00pm; we grab some good German fare, then are immediately picked up by Mike, a Turkish guy who has lived in Germany for 35

customers include Boris Becker, Steffi Graff and half the German football side. He gives us his card and says we should drop by for a freebie. He takes us the three hours to Nuremberg - we almost crossed Germany in a day. Not bad going. Camp the night, feeling pleased with our-

Next day, hot and sunny as ever (although it's totally out of season. so we are very lucky) and spend three hours trying to get out of the Nuremberg services. No joy, and we are searched three times by the police. They know our faces after that, and don't bother any more.

Eventually a local we name Daffy gives us a lift in his van, me in the back, to Nuremberg station. Meet another bummit team here, and split the train fare - 7 Euros (£4) each for the 200km train to Pilsen! It's a long trip, so we pass the whisky around and have a good laugh with 'The Invincibles

Arrive in the Czech Republic's second city at dusk. Get the tram and then walk to the hostel where everyone is meeting for the half way point. It is jammed, and I even have to share my bed with a girl (Zebede!) what a hardship.

Head out for a bit of a night out. which includes 40p beers, local cannabis vodka and ordering random Czech food off the menu. Suffice to say, a good night was had by all.

Wednesday we head to the station (using shopping trolleys for our bags - the local police liked that one!). Eight of us decide to be a bit different, and go through the ex-Yu-goslav states. So we wait two hours and blag the train to the south of Czech, getting fined £10 each by scary Uzi-wielding policemen for smoking in the station!

We keep the train blagging thing going, and head to Austria, going through Linz and Salzberg, meeting interesting locals at the two stations, including an Austrian studying in Dublin, a couple of punks and a guy who went to Sheffield Hallam in the

mid-eighties.

From Salzberg we head to Slovenia, sharing a cabin with a German ticket conductor and a well-spoken student. Six of us pile into the cabin - it's quite cosy! Wake up as we pass through awesome mountains - the best scenery yet.

Get into Lubyanka for early morning of Thursday. Go for a wander and have some pizza, before

Zagreb is a beautiful city, we all agreed, in both architecture and the feminine form. Have a good look around, then get a train to the outskirts where we eventually find a wood to camp in. Make a campfire out of glow sticks and play drinking games with cheap brandy. Great night. Everyone had to finish their sentence with the word penguin - most amusing!

Up late-ish Friday morning; we walk to the motorway, where the two teams of girls get picked up within 15 minutes, the team with two girls and a boy get picked up after an hour, and we don't. I knew we should have had a girl in our team!

Starts pouring down, and we spend seven hours in vain with no one stopping. We're surprisingly still happy though, and as we walk back to Zagreb the sun comes out.

We dry off, and then it's on to the train into Zagreb where we meet a couple of American girls - they turn out to be Mormons and offer to take us to their church and try and get train times and connections for us. We accept, and they give us times and chocolate as it's Good Friday. Pretty damn sweet!

We leave with Mormon Bible in hand and have four hours till our train. Go into the centre and blag a free Subway sandwich and watch a bit of Croatian telly. We then go into the main square which is pretty quiet; Croatia is 93% Roman Catholic, so not many people are out on Good

Sample another local beer - this one's a bit like Guinness, very nice before heading to the station. The train to Belgrade is six and a half hours, and we end up having to pay the 15 Euro fee. Share a compartment with two grumpy (snoring) old men, so we follow suit and get our

heads down.

Saturday morning, we arrive in the Serbian capital at 6.30am. It is grey and dank as we pass through the huge rubbish dumps/shanty towns of the outskirts. We're definitely getting towards the poorer part of Europe.

The station still has shrapnel marks, and the large building opposite has a huge shell hole left from the civil war. It's certainly an eye

We discover the train to Bucha-

rest (where we need to be tonight) is not until 4.00pm so spend the day exploring Belgrade, which is actually a very beautiful city, once the sun comes out and we wake up a bit.

We take in the large parks, interesting statues of cossack-type characters, impressive churches and war-torn embassies. We know we are getting a long way east as the language is very Russian in sound, and written in the cyrillic alphabet.

It's a fascinating experience, as I never thought I'd ever get to Serbia

under any circumstances.

We catch the train with some young Americans; it is supposed to get in at 7.30pm so we will be slightly late for the social, but can catch the others up, so not a prob-lem. After about an hour we are getting worried; the train hasn't gone above about 30 miles an hour and we are only just out of the outskirts of Belgrade. What's going on? We try and ask the conductor -

and manage to work out the answer this time. It gets in at 7.30am! We

have had a nightmare!

Absolutely gutted that we will not meet up with everyone else to share stories, drinks and probably (in my

The conductor takes sympathy, lets us stay on for free, and even lets us smoke in our non-smoking carriage. We try and play cards to take our minds off it, but even when our hip flask of brandy is gone we are still not the happiest of bunnies. Chris and I fly at 10.00am - so we know we won't even be able to see much of Bucharest.

As it gets dark we watch the ee-Transylvanian Mountains, shrouded in freezing mist, rattle by. It's an awesome sight - and we try to somehow make out Dracula's castle in the full moon light. Off to sleep,

annoyed and too hot. Sunday morning - we awaken as

we pull into Bucharest's huge North station. Off the train - to see it's 8.30am local time! The clocks have gone forward! Say hurried goodbye to Jimmy - who is hitching back to the UK, and Chris and I jump into a

Arrive at the airport after seeing the main street (huge dusty row of shops and bars) the local copy of the Arch de Triumph and the impressive central newspaper building. Will have to come back - looks very intereresting.

# Open day rounds off Falklands Conservation's 25th year

FALKLANDS CONSERVATION has marked the end of its 25th year celebrations with an open day.

The event, which was postponed from Saturday to Sunday due to poor weather, attracted around sixty visitors who gained a unique insight into the wildlife charity, including the chance to view two islands which are now rat free.

Inside the Falklands Conservation offices near the public jetty were a number of static displays depicting the charity's ongoing projects.

The stands covered a range of areas including survey work carried out on the Southern Giant Petrel and Albatross, the adventures of the children's Watch Group, progress on recording Falklands invertebrates and information on how Falklands Conservation is financially supported.

Out in the car park, visitors were able to examine up close a warp scarer and tori lines, mitigation devices used in deterring albatross from fishing trawlers.

The highlight of the day for most visitors was undoubtedly the boat trip to Top and Bottom Islands in Port William.

Groups of twelve boarded Sulivan Shipping Services launches for the trip which took them out to examine the two islands which have been rat-free for four years, following an intensive eradication programme.

They were able to witness firsthand the way bird life has flourished on the Islands since the rats were eradicated.

In addition to the outstanding



birdlife, visitors were also accompanied by porpoises and seals on their journey and, in the case of one group, able to witness up close the winching of a man from a Sea King helicopter on to the launch.

Sarah Clement of Falklands Conservation said she had been pleased with the public response to the day and, in particular, she was pleased to see a number of people from Mount Pleasant at the event

She said the charity had been delighted the launch trips were able to. "offer the opportunity to take a look at some of the wildlife that's right on our door step," and descrived the day as "a fitting end" to Falklands Conservation's 25th year celebrations.

# New exploration manager for gas and oil company | Argentina closes fishery

FALKLAND Oil and Gas Limited (FOGL) has announced the appointment of its new exploration manager

Patrick Bird (46) has twentyfour years experience of the oil and gas industry. For the past eight years he has been working for Premier Oil fulfilling various roles including: Exploration Manager - Pakistan: General Manager Exploration - UK: and CEO Premier Kufpec - Pakistan.

He has previously held exploration roles at Dragon Oil and at Scott Pickford, a consultancy specialising in geology, geophysics and petroleum engineering analyses. He began his career as a petroleum engineer for Shell International in

Patrick replaces Jim Webb, who had been acting as project manager for FOGL on a part-time basis. A company spokesperson commented. "It is now clear that FOGL requires a full time exploration manager and Jim felt unable to commit to a full-time role.

FOGL is currently undertaking

a 10.000km 2D seismic survey over its licence areas. It announced on February 17, when the survey was 50% completed, that the early processed results had provided further information on the eight leads referred to in the Alternative Investment Market (AIM) Listing Prospectus, as well as identifying several additional leads which could warrant further work. Overall, the company says, the indications for the data were encouraging

Now with some 80% of the survey completed. FOGL says it is evident that there are several dif-ferent "play types" (tilted fault blocks, rollovers, channels, seafloor fans, basement onlap), each with several leads. "It is particularly encouraging that possible Direct Hydrocarbon Indicators (DHIs which can be due to rock effects as well as oil and gas) are associated with a number of the leads and these DHIs could be indicative of a working petroleum system.

John Armstrong, Executive Chairman of FOGL commented. "Although it is still too early to be

definitive, the indications to date are encouraging; we have identified additional leads in the original licence area as well as a number of new leads in the licence area awarded to FOGL in December 2004. As a result, FOGL has many more opportunities than originally anticipated."

Mr Armstrong said further 2D and 3D seismic programmes, and possibly an electromagnetic survey, will be needed. evaluate the play types and leads to define prospects for drilling. The fully processed and interpreted results of the entire survey are expected to be available in the third quarter.

Mr Armstrong said the appointment of a full-time exploration manager with extensive experience is, "...testament to FOGL's development and circumstances.

"Patrick's appointment will help to ensure that we have the capability to properly assess and investigate all of the opportunities that are emerging from the current 2D seismic survey.

FOLLOWING on from the early closure of the Falklands illex fishery, the Argentine government has closed its zones too

A ban on illex squid fishing was made official by Argentina on Sun-

Mercopress reports that the decision was taken following a March 15 cruise report from the Mar del Plata based Fisheries Research and Development Institute, and a recommendation from the Federal Fisheries Council. "In both cases the insufficient squid biomass was considered as a threat for the fisheries long term sustainability and current recovery.

The Argentine ban means illex fishing is now completely banned in the South Atlantic EEZs: the Falkland Islands decided last week to close early and was hoping for similar action from the Argentines.

Last year, following extremely poor catches. Argentina and Falkland Islands also decided to advance the closure of the illex season.

#### Stanley Services shares sale

THE sale of the government's shares in Stanley Services Ltd continues to draw closer

Councillor Mike Summers, currently a director of SSL said the sale of 20% of shares in the company to the Lavinia Corporation has been completed which means the process "can now move to the next stage" selling the government's shares to the public. Mr Summers said no detailed discussions of how the sale will take place have yet been held.

## Conservation's awareness programme likely to attract teachers

FALKLANDS Conservation has successfully obtained funding for an environmental project based in the Falkland and Ascension Islands.

The Board of Education heard last week that the project's post is likely to attract applications from Falklands teaching staff.

The meeting heard that the 21month-long post would involve working directly with young people in schools developing and producing environmental based teaching/learning materials.

In the event of a Falklands teacher being appointed to the post.

the Director of Education assured the Board that a contract officer could be appointed if necessary to cover but this would be for a two year contract

#### News from the Planning Committee's April meeting

By Graham France

THIS was a quite lengthy meeting. with nearly thirty applications for planning permission and seventeen submissions for building permits to be reviewed, the "open" session lasted a little over one-and-a-half

Chaired as usual by the Hon Ri-chard Cockwell, the Hon Roger Edwards took the place of the Hon Norma Edwards who gave her apologies; other members in attendance were Gerald Cheek, Les Harris and Graham Middleton. Mike Harris and Mike McLeod also sent apologies for absence. Three members of the public were in attendance.

Of five applications held over from previous meetings, one (that for development at Dolphins Guest House on John Street submitted by the FIC) was withdrawn, another (a sign to be displayed on Atlantic House on Philomel Street) still awaited modification by the applicant. Energise Limited, and that for renewal of temporary planning permission for the extension to the quarry at The Frying Pan for Gordon Forbes Construction (Falklands) Limited was referred to Executive Council with the recommendation for approval. The other two submissions (application in principle for the erection of a terrace of ten garden sheds at 6 Jersey Road, and the yachting marina and car park west of SAMS jetty on Ross Road for South Atlantic Marine Services) were approved conditionally.

There were four applications for the renewal of temporary planning permission. One of which, that for Lookout Lodge on Kiel Canal Road. received permanent consent, two were extended, and the fourth - in respect two Wyseplan units sited for storage at the KTV site on Dairy Paddock Road - was deferred for further enquiries to be made.

One of the first of the new submissions to be reviewed was a retrospective application to operate a taxi business from a dwelling. Miss Lucinda Yon applied on behalf of Cindy Cabs and members were told of one letter of objection having been received in relation to the increase in traffic activity in unsocial hours. The Environmental Planning Officer (EPO), Dominique Giudicelli, said she would be reviewing all the current taxi companies operating in residential areas and recommended that this application be given temporary planning permission whilst this was being carried out. Members agreed and granted the applicant six months approval.

Other developments which received planning permission, the majority with conditions, were as follows: porches at 13 and 17 Jersey Road for Kita Bedford and Freda Alazia respectively; temporary sit-

ing of a container at 2 Davis Street for James (Wax) Lang, domestic garages at 4 Fieldhouse Close (Gus Reid). 7 Jersey Road (Sharon Marsh and Kenneth Jaffray), and 65 Davis Street (Mr and Mrs Ron Roberts); extensions to dwellings at 5 Capricom Road (Campbell Kirkham) and 23 Callaghan Road (Mike Wallace) the conversion of a domestic garage into a commercial food preparation area for consumption elsewhere at 3 Davis Street East for Hattie Lee; a single-storey dwelling to be built at I Sulivan Street for Timmy

Morrison, the siting of a Portakabin at 9 Pioneer Row by Bruce Miller to provide accommodation for an employee; the erection of an "NGN Switch" building in their main offices complex for Cable & Wireless, and an outline application for a warehouse at 17 Coastel Road for Consolidated Fisheries Limited

Of four applications submitted by the Public Works Department on behalf of Government, three were approved with conditions; alterations and an extension to the Water Treatment Works in Stanley, the construction in two phases of a new sewage disposal scheme with two pumping stations and two emergency outfalls from The Waterfront on Ross Road to the Miller Park Turning Head; and permission in principle for the crection of five houses on the Old Balloon Site off Bypass Road. The fourth submission, an outline application for eleven houses to be built to the rear of Racecourse Road, was deferred. A number of letters of objection had been received by the EPO and it was agreed that a development brief would be written and be the subject of public consultation before a decision was made

Two other applications were also deferred: alterations to Malvina House Hotel on Ross Road submitted by Stanley Services Limited, and an outline application for the erection of a pair of semi-detached dwellings at 112 Davis Street by Roger and Anne Howells. In the case of the latter the EPO said she intended to have discussions with the applicants on the provision of off-street parking and the proposed intensity of development before bringing the application back to the committee.

Building Adviser Graham France then reported upon applications for building permits. Whilst there were still a number where further information was still not to hand, he was able to say that nine permits had been or were about to be issued since the last meeting.

Before moving on to the "closed" session of the meeting, the date and time of the next was agreed and it is to be held in the Liberation Room on Thursday, May 5, com-

# General Practice: The new Needs Assessment

by Vicki Butler (Team Leader Rachel Hancox

IF YOU were to come forward now and request a community care service from either the District Nurse or Social Services then you will become, where appropriate, involved in the new Needs Assessment proc-

We hope that by the end of this article you will have a better understanding of what a community care service is and why an assessment of need is important.

A community care service is any service, which supports an individual living in their own home.

The service could be home help where assistance is given to individuals in terms of cleaning / general household chores, social work or district nurse support, sheltered housing, assessment for attendance

allowance, meals on wheels, assistance with form -filling / budgeting etc. This could be a temporary or long term requirement.

Up until now people who have required our services have undergone a less formal assessment and received a service where and when available

We now realise that we need a process, which makes sure the limited resources we have are made available to those people who need them the most.

In order to achieve this we have adapted a tried and tested assessment, which involves eligibility criteria, to provide you and us with a fair and transparent system.

We will work with you in the assessment process to try and un-

social Work Department) and (District Nurse)

derstand your specific needs in order for us to match a suitable serv-

The Needs Assessment covers a wide area taking into account a person's mobility, mental health, assessment of risk / hazards, support networks, emotional well being, physical and health needs, financial issues, housing and environmental factors, social function-

ing and sensory loss.

The aim of the assessment is to see how these areas impact on the individual's ability to do everyday

Advice and / or clarification is sought by related professionals where appropriate, for example the person's doctor or other specialist health professional.

One of the biggest resource and most important people in an individual's life are the carers. These include spouses, family members and neighbours.

Part of this new Needs Assessment takes into account the carers and they will also have the opportunity to express their own needs and views - these may differ from the person who they are caring for.

### St Helena's proposed Constitution: human rights

By Tony Green, Consultative Poll Manager THIS week, I'd like to talk about

another of the main differences between the existing Constitution and the proposed one. It's in the area of fundamental human rights.

Currently, the UK's 1998 Human

Rights Act applies to St Helena, but it's not in the Constitution. This means that if you think that you are not being fairly treated by the Government you need to see a lawver who will advise you on whether you have any protection under the UK's Human Rights Act.

It is proposed that the new Constitution spells out your fundamental human rights in detail. These rights are considered to be so fundamental that the government could not interfere with them unless it had a very good reason to do so

If you thought that the Government had breached your human rights, you could take your case to the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court would have wide powers to award compensation, to order the government to change its behaviour, and to strike down any laws that are inconsistent with your human rights.

The rights include: · Right to life

- · Protection from inhuman treatment
- · Protection from slavery and forced labour
- · Right to personal liberty (including treatment following arrest) · Right to a fair trial

- · Right of prisoners to humane
- treatment · Right to freedom of movement
- · Right to private and family life, and to privacy of home and other property
- Right to marry; spouses' and
- children's rights
   Right to freedom of conscience (thought and religion)
- · Right to education (including free primary education)
- Right to freedom of expression Right to freedom of assembly and association
- · Protection from deprivation of
- Protection from discrimination. • Right not to be arbitrarily de-prived of St Helenian status.

What's different and how might this affect you?

The main difference between the current set-up and the proposed one is that your fundamental human rights would be written down in the new Constitution, and your options to do something about unfair interference with your rights would be clearly spelt out. While your actual rights might not change much, you might find it easier, under the proposed new Constitution, to protect yourself against unfair treatment and get something done about it.

Next week, I'll start to look at one of the biggest differences between the existing Constitution and the proposed new one - the system of government.

## Wool report - week ending April 8 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

FLUCTUATING currency ra tes lead to increased demand and competition in all wool selling count\_rics last

week

It was unfortunate howe ver that the changes in currency rate's generally tended to work agains t prices expressed in terms of pence per kilogram clean. As a result at the end of the weeks trading greasy wool prices generally remained s teady at sales in Australia and New Zealand last week, but were up sliehtly in South Africa.

Price falls were noted at the finer end of the micron spectrum (falls of between 2 to 4 p/kg clean) Prices for other micron categorie's generally oscillated by plus or m inus one or two pence per kilogramm clean from pre-Easter closing pri ce s.

Broad buying interest was e vident with the top ten buyers pu rehasing

over 62% of the offering Fleece wool lots of good style and sound staple strength attracted most attention ("best style" lots received premiums of sever al pence per kilogram clean) as did better style low VM skirtings. "Average to inferior" style fleece wool lots were generally discounted by 6 to 8 pence per kilogram clean in the e weeks markets as were lots described as "ten-

der" and "part tender"
In the "carding market" locks and crutchings closed the week up 6 to 10 pence per kilogram clean, most probably on the back of positive news out of the northern-hemi-

sphere about recent knitwcar sales. In Australia 91% of the 70,952 bales available to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 5,402 bales of crossbred wool of which 92.1% was sold. In South Africa there was a 95.2% clearance of

the 15,719-bale offering.
Sales continue in New Zealand and Australia next week where approximately 90,000 bales in total will be offered for sale.



# Venezuela support is 'kiss of death' for Chilean OSA candidate

CHILE'S Foreign Affairs Minister Ignacio Walker said on Tuesday that two countries committed to vote for Chilean candidate Jose Miguel Insulza as the next Secretary General of the Organisation of American States (OAS) have switched their support to Mexican Luis Ernesto Derbez.

Votes are counted at the time of the election; we always said that. What we pointed out (before the election) is that we had a majority and, I repeat, had 19 votes lined up and we finally had 17. Therefore two let us down, but that's the way elections go," Mr Walker admitted with resignation.

Last Monday in Washington the Chilean and Mexican candidates for the OAS post tied 17-17 in a round of five ballots, so the organisation decided to hold another open election May 2.

However OAS watchers believe that a strong last-moment push from Washington was decisive in turning votes for Mr Derbez, particularly since the Chilean candidate was backed by Venezuelan president Hugo Chavez who, with aid and oil promises, rallied many Caribbean votes.

According to these analysts Mr Insulza's chances of achieving a majority were wrecked by what several called "the kiss of death": the Chilean's endorsement by the Venezuelan President, the left-wing populist who is threatening to displace Fidel Castro as the "most destabilising force" in the region according to President Bush's administration

Mr Derbez on the other hand has served as Foreign Secretary in Mexico's conservative government for the past two years, while Mr Insulza became Chile's Interior Minister in 2000 under Socialist President Ricardo Lagos.

Talking to journalists in Valparaiso, the seat of Chile's Congress, Mr Walker refused "to give names" and emphasised that Mr. Insulza enjoyed the support from half of the region's 34 countries. which stood fast in five consecutive polls "in a difficult, perhaps adverse, environment" in direct reference to Washington's arm twisting.

The Chilean Foreign Affairs

Ministry confirmed that on Tuesday Mr Insulza met in Washington with Roger Noriega, US Assistant Secretary of State for Western Hemisphere Affairs, and Thomas Shannon, the Latin American specialist on the National Security Council.

In spite of the secret ballot it's known that the Mexican candidate was supported by North and Central America countries plus the votes of Paraguay. Bolivia. Peru and Colom-

Mr Insulza was backed by Argentina, Brazil, Uruguay, Ecuador, Venezuela and the Caribbean countries strongly lobbied by President Hugo

## Inflation concerns become real for Kirchner's administration

ARGENTINE Economic Minister Roberto Lavagna has admitted that inflation in 2005 could reach 11% above the targeted band of 8 to

"Obviously we're all working to keep to the lower end of the band, 8%," added Mr Lavagna who yesterday left the Inter American Development Bank annual general assembly and headed for Frankfort to meet with President Nestor Kirchner who is on an official five day visit in Ger-

Retail prices in Argentina accumulated during the first quarter 4% equivalent to half the estimated objective for the whole twelve months which has sound alarms in the Economy Ministry.

Surging inflation is a big threat for the high public opinion standing of the Kirchner administration which also faces crucial legislative elections next October.

Besides given the vulnerable fi-

nancial situation of the country price hikes submerge even more Argentines into poverty. According to the latest official data an estimated 40% of the population is below the line of poverty.

Mr Lavagna will join President Kirchner in Germany who is looking to fortify Argentina's international political support ahead of upcoming talks with the International Monetary Fund over a possible new aid agreement.

President Kirchner is scheduled to meet with German Chancellor Gerhard Schröder, President Horst Kohler and Bayarian leader Edmund Stoiber

Mr Kirchner will also be seeking to lure new German investments to Argentina, but Kirchner's main goal is to muster Germany's support within the G-7 group of industrial-ized nations and in the International Monetary Fund after Argentina's successful debt swap

#### 'Open' shares sale?

A STANLEY businessman is calling on the government to be more open about the sale of shares in Stanley Services Ltd.

In an email to councillors, the Governor, the Attorney General and the press. Mr Stuart Wallace said he believes the entire affair. has been handled in an inappropriate way," and that, "...in a matter touching such a crucial service the public have a right to be kept informed

Speaking to the Falklands Islands Broadcasting Station on Wednesday, Councillor Mike Summers spoke about the sale of shares and said he was aware there were certain parties, "...who want to see all the documents to the transaction and all the detailed commercial arrangements between the par-

He said this could not happen: "It is a commercial arrangement and those documents cannot and won't be released. But the basis of the deal, has been well known for a considerable period of time

Mr Wallace said "hiding" behind the "excuse" of 'commercial confidence' is, "just that - an excuse, to avoid proper discussion and scrutiny of what is being done.

Mr Wallace described the proceedings as "a sorry state of affairs" and said he does not expect every document to be made available, "...however flawed I may feel has been the process, or questionable the probable result

He said he believes that when the deal is finally agreed, "... at the very least, the full terms of the agreement must be publicly available.

#### Brand will be used

THE Falklands Finest brand is to come into use as a "mark of origin" for the Islands but will not be used as a "quality mark"

It was agreed at a meeting of the Falkland Islands Development Board on Tuesday that the brand which was initiated in 2000 will drop the word finest and just have 'Falkland Islands' beneath the symbol that resembles fronds of tussac grass blowing in the wind.

The Board suggested that anyone wishing to use the symbol as a mark of origin should contact the Development Corporation

# Toothfish poacher fined

THE owners and master of longline vessel Elgui have been fined for illegally fishing for Patagonian toothfish in South Georgia waters.

At the end of a one day trial held on Monday, the Senior Magistrate, Mrs Clare Faulds, declared Elqui's owners, Geneagles Corporation, and her master. Christian Henriquez Vargas, guilty of permitting the boat to be used for fishing without a licence.

Both parties had earlier pleaded guilty to charges of failing to notify the South Georgia Marine Officer when Guinea-flagged Elqui entered the zone, and of permitting the vessel to carry an unstowed fishing line and gear without a licence

Mrs Faulds fined Geneagles a total of £250,000 for the three offences and ordered the company to pay approximately £59,000 in prosecution costs. Sr Vargas was fined a total of £2,000 and will pay £500 prosecution costs.

At the start of Monday's trial. lawver Richard Marlor, who had previously been instructed to act on behalf of Geneagles, withdrew from the case as he had received no further instructions from the company. He said he felt, "... unable to act any further." The trial proceeded without representation.

Elqui was arrested in the South Georgia zone on March 2 after reports were made by two cruise ships to Fishery Patrol Vessel Sigma. Sigma caught up with Elqui and she was boarded by a Fishery Patrol Officer.

He carried out an inspection of the vessel and discovered 247 boxes of baited longline, "ready to be deployed". Further inspection revealed a number of rice sacks and boxes filled with frozen toothfish. The ship's master. Mr Vargas, confirmed to the officer that there were approximately thirteen tonnes of toothfish aboard the vessel.

Elqui was escorted to Stanley by Sigma following her arrest.

In court on Monday, Sr Vargas said Elqui had been fishing north of the South Georgia zone between February 19 and 28. He said he was steaming through the South Georgia zone on March 1 when the vessel began to experience engine problems.

He told the court that it was commonplace on fishing vessels that the hooks should have frozen bait put on them. He said the bait could then be used "one, two or three days later"

Nic Huin of Falklands Conservation said the two would have come straight from Beauchene Island, at the very south of the Falklands, and it probably took them two to three hours to fly up to Stanley, being pushed by strong south-west winds.

"These and probably more were blown off course and were attracted by the Stanley lights. I can't understand what they mean to them, but they decided to crash land in Stanley and got confused, found a nice garden and went to sleep.

Mr Huin said anyone who spots another albatross in Stanley should. just call us in the office and we can deal with them. Either they are fine and we release them, or they are injured and need treatment or termination." Continued on page 5

#### Tanker aground: minor oil leak

REEFER vessel Nova Scotta grounded near Cochon Island on Tuesday evening as she attempted to enter Berkeley Sound.

The vessel managed to free itself and anchored in the Sound.

Around lunch time on Wednesday a report was received that the vessel was leaking oil. The Chief Executive. Mr Chris Simpkins, said, The leak involves heavy fuel oil from a tank said to contain around 130 tonnes of oil.

The FIG Marine Officer has visited the vessel and describes the leak as a 'small weep'

Mr Simpkins said the oil is dispersing quickly and is drifting out to sea. "The situation and weather conditions are being carefully monitored and, at present, there is no risk to wildlife sites.

I DID not envy the legal bods involved in the *Elqui* trial this week; these cases which involve, shall we say, less than transparent companies must be a legal headache.

I left court on Tuesday with a feeling of discontent and couldn't help wondering whether the time and money dedicated to the prosecution was worthwhile.

On first impressions, the possible income to be acquired from fines would seem to make it justifiable but how likely is it that South Georgia will ever see the money?

What chance at all do they have of getting a cent out of a company which declined to answer correspondence even from its own appointed legal representative?

But then, perhaps money isn't the point.

Maybe I am focusing too narrowly and the benefits to be gained from a conviction are actually of a less financially-centred nature. (I blame councillors - all this talk of saving money is clearly having an effect on me.)

The damage poaching can inflict upon a fishery reaches further than the coffers of government. It's essentially environmental pillaging.

Globally, fish is becoming a threatened resource; to allow illegal fishing to go unpunished, or to chastise with a mere rap on the knuckles, would be ecologically irresponsible.

The sooner we get word out to the wider world - and into the networks of these disreputable companies - that poaching won't be tolerated in these southern parts of the world, the better.

Geneagles is most unlikely to pay up in the next seven days but it must be some consolation to South Georgia that the company will forfeit the vessel if it doesn't.

The *Elqui* may not be worth much on paper but her loss will hopefully hit the company where it hurts - in the pocket.

It seems the only way to get through to these unscrupulous organisations.

#### Desire 'very excited' about oil prospects

AT LEAST one billion barrels of oil could lie in the North Falklands Basin, shareholders in Desire Petroleum heard on Monday evening.

At a meeting held in the Chamber of Commerce, Chief Executive of Desire, Dr Ian Duncan, said the company had learned much from exploration drilling carried out in 1998 and is now, "...so very excited about the north."

Desire is also

Desire is planning to drill three exploratory wells next summer.

The 1998 drilling found rich source rock - described by some as the second richest in the world. Five of the six wells drilled had oil or gas and oil shows.

None of the wells drilled in 1998 are in exactly the same areas Desire plans to drill. The company will target what is known as "hydrocarbon kitchens", identified by a 3D seismic survey, where oil has been generated and expelled. One such area. Dr Duncan said, is "smack bang" in the middle of Tranches C and D, where Desire will be drilling its three exploratory wells.

Dr Duncan said the first well the company expects to drill, named Liz, has potential for two billion barrels of oil.

Desire hopes to have a rig mobilised to the area by late 2005/early 2006. The drilling is expected to last approximately three months.

Bob Lyons of Peak Well Man-

agement, the company contracted by Desire to carry out well design and drilling project management, also addressed Monday evening's gathering of shareholders.

He explained the drilling operation which would, as was the case in 1998, use a semi-submersible rig; he said people in the Falklands. "...won't notice much difference from before."

He said around 100 people would be employed on the rig and around 12-15 on land.

A shareholder asked the panel from Desire how, in light of Argentina's ban on charter flights to the Falklands, the company envisaged crew changes being carried out.

Mr Lyons admitted that this is, "...one of the biggest logistical challenges we face," but said the company was exploring a number of options for crew changes.

When asked why interest in Falklands hydrocarbons is so high. Desire Chairman. Dr Colin Phipps said, with the rise of the world oil price to more than US\$50 a barrel, "...a lot more people are willing to take a chance."

He added that the growing price of gas also makes it an "economic" option particularly in light of new gas to liquid technology, which produces diesel from natural gas.

Dr Duncan, Dr Phipps and Mr Lyons left the Islands on Tuesday.

#### FIMCo faces hurdles in export season

THE Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) has experienced a few delays throughout its export season to date, according to a paper put before the Falkland Islands Development Board on Tuesday.

In week seven of the 16 week planned export season, Falklands Landholdings (FLH) notified FIMCo that they would not supply sheep that week and were revising numbers down for the rest of the season below 2004 levels. This cost FIMCo an additional £20,000.

At the beginning of week 11 Tamar F1 experienced a breakdown when it was due to move sheep from the West. Despite the best

efforts of all involved, production was down by 120 sheep. The board heard that the position in week 12 is even more serious with much lower volumes, including some days where there is no production forecast.

The financial forecast has been reviewed and the government has been put on notice that FIMCo might need an additional £50,000 to cover unforeseen eventualities.

Chairman of the Board, Councillor Mike Summers said there are "lots of issues" around FIMCo and always will be. He said. "FIMCo is only in its third year, it is still young," adding, "...farmers are beginning to change systems and there is still a lot to achieve."

#### Hospital plea: please don't waste dental appointments

THE hospital has appealed to patients to keep their dental appointments.

King Edward VII Memorial this week reported that in the last four weeks, 25 people have simply failed to turn up for dental appointments.

The Director of Health. Mr Norman McGregor Edwards, said these have included people who have been given long emergency appointments claiming that they had toothache, and children whose parents had been telephoned beforehand to remind them of their appointments.

He said these represent 25 lost appointments in which other peo-

ple could have been treated.

Mr McGregor Edwards commented: "Given the pressure on dental appointments at the moment, it is difficult to understand how 25 people could simply not turn up, rather than ring to cancel their appointment and allow someone else to use it. I would appeal to everyone - please, if you cannot keep your appointment, ring up and cancel it in good time and then we can offer it to someone else."

The hospital is expecting the arrival of another dentist at the end of April for three months to help meet the demand for appointments. She is Stefanie Toerien from South Africa.

### Beef supply gives food for thought | Falklands live firing is cost saving



THE Falklands needs better coordination when it comes to getting local beef onto plates. according to a special workshop held in Stanley last week

Thirty farmers, retailers and others with an interest in Falklands beef supply met at the Argos building on April 15 to discuss the issues and challenges they face.

The Beef Day was arranged by the Development Corporation (FIDC) to bring together as many people as possible involved in beef production. Farmers from the East. West, and the Islands, along with several Stanley retailers, contributed to a day of lively debate.

An FIDC survey carried out earlier this month in preparation for the day was returned by farmers holding 60 per cent of the Islands' beef. Of those, more than 90 per cent agree that there is a problem with the supply of beef to local consumers.

Workshop participants agreed that consumers need more consistent quality and want to be able to buy beef all year round. Several retailers told the producers present that they would be able to sell more beef if it was provided regularly and was always of a high quality.

One of the session's participants, Seafish General Manager Hamish Wylie, said afterwards: "I felt that the workshop led us all to logical conclusions that everyone agreed with. From a retailer's perspective. I hope that following this workshop we see a rationalisation of the supply chain which will give

us a regular supply of product. He added: "Once we have this we can work with the industry to increase the consumption of local beef. I am sure that we can more than double the consumption of beef products in the local market.

Also the recognition that everyone in the system has to make an adequate profit for it to be sustainable was important.

The workshop came to the clear conclusion that there is a need for an unbiased wholesaler or processor of beef to improve the current problems with supply Participants felt this would iron out inconsistencies in quality and supply for consumers, as well as making it easier for farmers to get their meat to market.

The most likely candidate to fill the gap at this point in time was thought to be the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) because it already has the infrastructure in place to move animals around the Islands and to chill meat directly after processing.

The Sand Bay abattoir does not currently process beef on a regular basis, but board members are expected to consider whether this might be done in future.

Although the aim of the day was not to find a "magic wand" solution, the individuals and organisations involved left with their minds more focused on the issues at stake and returned to their farms, shops and businesses with some serious food for thought.

# Toothfish poacher fined Continued from front

SR VARGAS said the position Elqui was steaming to was outside the 200 mile zone of South Georgia and added that no evidence had been found to say Elqui had fished in the South Georgia zone.

He said he had failed to call the Marine Officer in South Georgia as he did not know how to do so or that it was even a requirement; he considered *Elqui* was "just going through innocently," and she could do so without giving notice.

The case was heard by the Falklands Magistrate's Court but was prosecuted under the legislation of the Government of South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands.

Delivering her sentence on

Tuesday morning, the Senior Magistrate said poaching "cannot be tolerated" and "must be deterred".

She said the owners of any ship have the heavy responsibility to maintain proper control of their vessel and its operation. However she added that she was satisfied Sr Vargas had shown a "somewhat cavalier" approach to conservation and was not acting on specific instructions from the ship's owners.

The vessel will be detained until the fine is paid; if the funds are not forthcoming within seven days, the vessel will be forfeited and the Crown can sell it on behalf of the Government of South Georgia.

A FAMILIAR face to Islanders. former civil/military liaison officer Major Terry Turner was in the Islands this month for a live firing exercise

Major Turner, who was civil liaison officer in 1996 brought 13 Senior Non-Commissioned Officers from the Royal School of Artillery for a live firing course held near Port Harriet

He said the course, which ended late last week, had been an "outstanding success". Its purpose was to test participants on how to establish and safely operate a range (for the firing of high velocity ground to air missiles) from nothing: "It's important to train them to do this as they will be going to areas where they have to set up a range from scratch.

Major Turner said that holding the course in the Falklands had been. .a good cost saving measure." Formerly, students have headed to the United States but, he said, "...with today's budgeting, the fact the British military is already here means

there are no significant costs involved. It's better value to come

The students fired 38 high velocity missiles in total - 25 real and 13 practice. They were firing against the Banshee Target Drone, a process which is by no means cheap.

Major Turner explained, "Each

real missile is worth around £30,000 so we've fired around £700,000 this week." That figure includes a replacement drone after one fell victim to a particularly accurate shot.

Major Turner said he was grateful for the "invaluable" assistance he had received from range warden Marvin Clark and he thanked the Falklands authorities along with Port Harriet owner Joe Newell and Owen Summers of Falklands Landholdings for allowing the live firing to go ahead.

He said, "It was tremendous training and I'm very keen to hold future courses here - so long as the Falkland Islands Government is willing.

#### Many charges but no pleas in court

A NUMBER of men had cases adjourned without plea in court on Wednesday.

Ryan Hawksworth appeared alongside Andrew MacDonald and Christopher Saunders to face a joint charge of violent disorder.

Mr MacDonald also faces a charge of affray and Mr Saunders faces a charge of grievous bodily harm, while Mr Hawksworth faces charges of affray and assault.

These charges follow a series of incidents which occurred on April 2.

Later on Wednesday morning, Mr Hawksworth stood with a group of three different men who together face charges of affray following an incident on March 17.

Mr Hawksworth, John McKay, Melvyn Clifton and

Mervyn Lee did not enter pleas to the charges. Mr McKay is also charged with assault and he entered no plea to the charge.

All the cases were adjourned until April 28.

Gavin Browning also had his case adjourned until April 28.

He is charged with stealing a packet of cigarettes from Beachene on John Street.

Mr Browning entered no plea to the charge.

His defence counsel, Mr Ian Warburton, said while he had initially considered the matter to be of a "frivolous" nature, he could now see the matter is more serious and asked that the case be adjourned to allow him time to take instruction from his client

#### Falklands wool very much a secret

THE British Wool Marketing Board (BWMB) have said that they do not believe Falklands wool is achieving market prices for its characteristics and that it does not exist in the world wool market, ...it is kept very much a secret."

Falkland Islands Development Board General Manager Julian Morris met with senior manage-ment of BWMB during a recent visit to UK.

Further comments were that the merchants currently dealing with Falklands wool have little interest in developing it; "they don't have the resources or financial alignment

to do so."

A member of the board said that Falkland wool has a good reputation as a wool for blending however the problem is that although it is sold as Falkland wool the identity is lost once blended.

A paper before the board recommended that Falklands wool should be exposed to the market to add value.

A report from a wool classer is to be obtained and Mr Morris suggested the issue should be followed up with the Department of Agriculture.

#### Land Rover's assurances in wake of MG closure

ANY FEARS Land Rover fans in the Falklands may have held following the closure of MG Rover in the United Kingdom have been allayed by the 4x4 company.

This week, Land Rover released a statement to clarify that MG Rover and Land Rover are two separate companies.

A spokesperson said, "...in the year 2000 Land Rover joined and became part of Premier Automotive Group, the section of Ford Motor Company that combines its luxury brands.

'In addition to Land Rover, the group also includes Aston Martin, Jaguar and Volvo. Land Rover has had no relationship whatsoever with MG Rover since that year.

The spokesperson added, "It should be pointed out that Land Rover is currently going through the best time in its whole history."

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
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# Three cheers for Her Majesty's birthday

THE Falkland Islands has celebrated the birthday of its beloved sovereign.

An annual tradition in the Islands, a parade was held in Stanley yesterday to commemorate Her Majesty's birthday and cold overcast weather did not deter a large crowd from attending.

Detachments from the Royal Navy, Royal Air Force, Army and Falkland Islands Defence Force were on parade at Victory Green, and the marching troops were supported by the Band of the Light Division.

Community groups were well represented with members of the Scouts, Guides, Sea Cadets, and other organisations in attendance.

The parade began with the arrival of the Commander of British Forces (CBF). Air Commodore Richard Lacey, who received a General Salute. His Excellency the Governor. Mr Howard Pearce, the Queen's representative in the Falklands, soon arrived, the parade was called to attention and he took the Royal Salute.

An inspection of the Parade was then held by His Excellency and CBF with musical accompaniment from the band. Once they had returned to the dais, the Royal Salute was given again and His Excellency's flag was hauled down; in its place, the Royal Standard was hoisted.

A twenty-one gun salute. fired from the Victory Green guns by members of the Defence Force, echoed impressively across Stanley Harbour in the calm conditions.

MR HUIN explained the releasing process in case people in Camp find uninjured birds needing a hand: "Grab them by the bill and hold them tight - getting bitten is very painful."

"Find a place away from lights and away from obstacles like fences, poles and electrical wires. Find a nice cliff top or little hill facing the sea and release them

"Chicks will take off on their own, making their own judgement about wind strength. They are most likely to take off during the night, so birds released might stay there for a few days until wind conditions are right for take off."

Mr Huin said it was important that people do not attempt to feed the birds as, "...they are fasting at the moment and will only feed at

"Trying to feed them will result in a very stressed chick and some very painful and bloody hands."

# 'Someone at the helm of FLH failed to spot the problems...

HAVING read the article in Penguin News (April 8) entitled 'No looking back for Falkland Landholdings', I would like to make a few comments.

First, is it legal practice to write off expenditure on an assumed accounting procedure, especially as no payments were actually made to anyone?

Secondly, it was rather surprising to hear the General Manager say they would have to check the farm statistics before confirming sheep numbers at Walker Creek He should pretty much know the overall total for each of his sections.

The reason why he was not able to answer at the time is probably due to the fact that, for the past two years, both Walker Creek and Goose Green sheep have been jointly included under the Goose Green statistics. I am not sure as to the reason for this, because I believe the Walker Creek sheep are still sheared at the settlement. If so, it could be then said that the statistics have been incorrectly supplied

There could be another reason for the decision to add these two sections together. The following information (figure 1) extracted from the issues of the annual stock returns of which I have a complete set, will show which section has done best in stock management.

At or near the time of purchase by Falklands Landholdings (FLH) sections had the following numbers of sheep. I have included present day figures as well (figure 2)

After 2002, Walker Creek figures are incorporated with Goose Green which is why neither the General Manager or Councillor Cockwell were able to answer how many stock are at Walker Creek at this time. Figure 2 below shows the current sheep numbers differences from 1990-1991 to 2003-2004 for all sections added together.

The problem of sheep reductions do not of course just lay with FLH. Many other farmers have. for one reason or another, moved away from sheep to other ventures. The same period of statistics for the rest of the Falklands, excluding Landholdings' section, show that there has been an 18.28% drop.

Councillor Cockwell says that they sell old hairy sheep to the abattoir; I believe that is not entirely the case when several of the sections supply fat lamb to the abattoir and I know of one small farmer who used to receive young stock annually from Fitzroy. Many of the older sheep are rejected by the abattoir because they no longer come up to the kill out weight. These sheep, just like the thousands in the many years before FLH was created, would be mass culled and killed. The real problem with FLH stock is that section operators are selling far too many of their younger replacement stock

and indeed disposing of too many older breeding ewes.

I also think that the remark made by Councillor Cockwell that the "What you should have done" approach is wrong and the "We are where we are" is right, is the whole fact as to why FLH has gone wrong. He should be very much looking at the past and finding out exactly where the major problems began and ensure that those problems are not repeated in the future. I, like many other farmers have made decisions that did not work, but we all learned from those mistakes.

Someone at the helm of FLH failed to spot the problems a long time ago and because of that the last very large chunk of public property is in a serious situation.

Although I am a critic of many things. I do not want to see the disposal of Landholdings. Many of us small farmers never really wanted such large scale break up of the other farms and some of us purchased land to stay on it. We also lost our communities.

If the majority of people were honest, small farms were not really as successful as was intended to be. True, we learned to adapt to survive and this is exactly what FLH needs to do now.

If I am critical of the operations of Landholdings then it is because it appears to me that successive people who have been on the Board never really took full control of the financial affairs; because of these mistakes, others have had opportunity to divert most finances and stock.

Forty thousand pounds to have the books audited is a clear indication to me of how some people may have been allowed to manipulate those in charge. With modern computing equipment shouldn't this cost be a mere fraction of what is claimed to be the case.

If any reader out there does not want to see the break up or sell out of FLH, I suggest you get writing. Robin Goodwin Green Field Farm

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### Housing letter sparks further discussion on horse racing

MY letter. 150+ object to new housing', published in Pengiun News April 15, provoked considerable response - not with respect to the planned housing development, but concerning the Stanley Sports Association's (SSA) annual race meetings

Several people asked why, if the first meeting was held on the present racecourse in 1909, it will not be until 2012 that the 100th anniversary meeting is scheduled to take place? Following many months of research. I have discovered several interesting facts about the various SSA meetings.

The first organised race meeting in Stanley. (Darwin Harbour began way back in the 1870's) took place in 1907 at Whalebone Bay, where the Lady Elizabeth is now beached. However the SSA was not officially formed until June 1908, and although most of the same people were involved, the 1907 race day is not recognised as an official meeting.
The 1908 races were also held at

Whalebone Bay, but in order to make the location of the races more accessible for spectators, the 1909 meeting was moved to 'Mr. Vere Packe's Paddocks', which is the site of the present racecourse. A contract for £75 was given to John Barnes to

remove the rocks, and most of these ended up forming the wall around Sullivan House. Mr Packes home at the time.

The 1914 Christmas Meeting was cancelled, following the Battle of the Falklands on 8th December. and the prize money which had been collected was donated to the War

Although a Governor's Cup was competed for (won by Mrs Greenshield's Charabelle, jockey Joe Butler), the February 1927 meeting, held to commemorate the unveiling of the 1914 Battle Memorial, was not recognised by the SSA as an official meeting

The 1939 Christmas meeting was cancelled following the outbreak of World War II, but surprisingly an official SSA meeting took place on Boxing Day 1940. However this was confined to foot and gymkhana events only - there was no horse rac-

The SSA cancelled the meetings of 1941, 42 and 43, and despite the ongoing hostilities did organise a meeting in 1944, when the late William Morrison won the Governor's Cup on Queen Shilling.

Racing took place again in 1945,

but the Christmas 1946 event was held over until March 1947 when the 'Victory' meeting took place. The traditional Christmas races went ahead in December 1947.

On many occasions when special events, such as the 1933 Falklands Centenary was celebrated 1957 when the Duke of Edinburgh visited and 1977 which saw the Queen's Silver Jubilee, the Christmas meeting of the previous year was cancelled, and two meetings held in the celebratory year. Since 1908, five SSA meetings

have been cancelled because of the World Wars, which means that 2004 was quite rightly the 92nd meeting, and therefore 2012 will see the 100th anniversary meeting under the auspicies of the SSA.

Finally, the outstanding Governor's Cup winner of all-time must surely be Bambina which won the Cup on 5 successive occasions - 1933, 1934 (Feb and Dec), 1935. and 1936. This fine horse, originally imported by Mr Peter Coutts of Cantera, finished third in the 1937 race. Secret also won the Cup five times, but not in successive years.


Of course housing is important but do we have to build on every space around town? What next shops on Victory Green or flats on children's play areas?

Sarah Clement of Falklands Conservation said the band took the news that they were the entertainment pretty well: "They were originally going to play only forty minutes of music but they ended up playing from 9.30pm to 12.30am.

WITH reference to the forthcoming Falkland Islands Tourist Board/Practical Photography competition, what gives the Tourist Board or Practical Photography the right to retain and use entrants' material without consent or payment?

Presumably the copyright belongs to the taker of the photograph and any wish to retain or use such material should have the consent of the owner.

If this organisation has the right to such conditions, can it be assumed that any member of the public has the same right to use anyone else's material without their permission?

A Our thanks go to Andrew James. editor of Practical Photography, for providing the following response

BY ENTERING a competition where a prize can be won and where the rules are clear and unequivocal, the entrant is deemed to be abiding by those rules and giving their consent for use of the image as stated.

Of course the photographer retains overall copyright and any use of his or her picture outside the immediate needs of that competition does require agreement between the photographer and whoever wishes to use the image.

For example, if you win or are shortlisted in the competition and we wanted to use your picture to illustrate the best images received, then we would by virtue of that rule, expect to be able to use your image without payment. However, if we simply wanted to use your picture to

illustrate an unrelated article at a later date then we would naturally need your permission and agree a fee

We feel this rule is a fair balance between the rights of the photographer and the needs of the promoter and have been using it for many years. Images are not retained for very long and we never use them beyond the fair limits of the competition, as stated in the rules - for results and publicity.

As you rightly state, use of an individual's images without permission is a breach of copyright and should be frowned on If an individual feels strongly that this rule is unfair and they do not wish to give permission for their picture to be used on results pages or related publicity for a competition then they reserve the right NOT to enter that competi-

Q HOW is the figure of £68,000 calculated for the plots for sale on Haskard Rise? Can you provide a breakdown?

Is there now a policy to sell both subsidised plots and non-subsidised plots? If so, why has there been this change in policy?

A Government Secretary, Pete King, kindly provided the following reply. IN OCTOBER 2003 Executive Council approved a proposal to develop 12 housing plots in the vicinity of the old BFFI site, subject to planning permission, and agreed to sell two of the plots (Nos 2 and 3) to the Foreign and Commonwealth

Planning permission was subsequently sought. The first application for some 13 plots was withdrawn in November 2003 and replaced with an application for eight plots. Objections to the eight-plot development were received from the public and the matter was again referred to Executive Council who decided that the development of four plots should proceed, but requested a comprehensive development plan for the area before considering the eightplot proposal further. The final cost of the installation of services to the area, which has provided only four plots but which has been designed to support more, is £343,200 made up as shown below

Because at least some of the land on the south of the access road will hopefully be utilised at a future date an apportionment of 68% of the total costs was allocated to the four plots currently available, equalling £233,376. From this was deducted the £97.126 paid by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office for two of the plots under a pre-existing agreement (based on the estimate at that time for the cost of installing services), leaving a balance of £136.250 which divided by two equals £68,125 per plot.

The method of disposal of these two housing plots by public tender, without including an upset price but indicating only what the estimated servicing costs were, was an attempt to both test the market and to recover as much as possible of those servicing costs.

Executive Council considered in January 2004 a paper concerning the future provision by Government of sub-

#### St Helena's proposed Constitution: the people who make the island's laws

WE'VE now looked at two of the main differences between the existing Constitution and the proposed one

This week, I would like to look at one of the other major differences - the most important of all, to many people - and that is in the system of government we have. Today we'll be looking at the Legislature, or the people who make the island's laws.

The Current Set-up: Legislative Council

At the moment, there are eight electoral areas. The rules for who is allowed to vote are set out in a law. When there is a general election (or bye-election) you vote for one or two Councillors from the candidates who stand in your area. The Councillors you elect, along with the Speaker, the Chief Secretary, the Financial Secretary and the Attorney General, together form the Legislative Council (LegCo). LegCo is responsible for considering and debating any new laws for St Helena and can also debate other matters.

When making decisions about new laws, every elected Councillor, plus the Chief Secretary and Financial Secretary each has a vote. The Speaker only gets to vote if there is a split vote

LegCo also decides how the Government's finances should be allocated each year, or in other words, how much money should be spent on what. However, the Governor does currently have a reserved power to sign a Bill into law, including the Appropriation Bill, even if it has not been passed by LegCo.

The Proposed Set-up: Legislative Assembly

Under the proposed new system. voting would be island-wide; at a general election, everyone could vote for up to 12 people, from a list of all the candidates for the whole of St Helena. The rules about who would be allowed to vote would be the same as currently, unless the Legislative Assembly amends the law to change

The 12 people with the most votes, plus the Speaker and the Attorney General, would make up the Legislative Assembly. The Legislative Assembly would replace the existing LegCo.

The Legislative Assembly would be responsible for making laws, just like LegCo currently is. When deciding on new laws, every elected member of the Assembly would have a vote. The Assembly would debate and approve, as at present, how the Government's finances should be allocated each year. This would include deciding on their own salaries and other benefits, but in deciding on these they would have to take into account the advice given in an independent report. This report has not been written yet, but would need to be before any salaries could be ap-

What's different, and how might this affect you?

Number of electoral areas One major difference under the proposed new constitution is that in a General Election you will vote for all 12 members of the Legislative Assembly, instead of just one or two. as at present. This could mean that there will be more competition between people standing for election. and that they will have to work harder to understand what everyone wants, and to convince as many voters as possible across the whole island to vote for them. The new arrangement will result in you having a wider choice of elected representatives

On the other hand, it might be possible to go part of the way towards this result without changing the Constitution, because the existing Constitution already allows for the number of electoral districts to be cut from eight to two.

 Law-making by people elected by you

Another difference is that under the proposed new constitution, when deciding on new laws, only those people you elected will be able to vote. The Attorney General would be the only non-elected official who would be a member of the Assembly, and he wouldn't have a right to vote.

The Governor would no longer have the power to assent to a Bill, unless it has been passed by a majority in the Assembly. This would mean that the members you elected would have the responsibility of deciding whether or not to pass a particular law in the form supported by the majority. But how good these laws are will still depend on the people who make them

Eligibility criteria for those wishing to stand for election

Now, anyone, (with some exceptions, like people in prison) can stand for election to the Legislative Council, provided they are a British/ British Overseas Territories Citizen. and eligible to vote in a General Election. Under the proposed Constitution, the rules would be up to the Legislative Assembly, so when you vote in the Poll, you won't know exactly what these rules would be However, LegCo has said that they should be pretty much the same as now, though they might be relaxed. for example to make it easier for Saints returning to the island to stand. Whoever you elect to the new Legislative Assembly wouldn't have to share the same view as the current LegCo members, but they would probably make their views known in the run-up to the first General Elec-

The Governor has decided that, as currently, almost all public servants will be entitled to apply to stand in the first General Election under a new Constitution. However, after this, under the new Constitution, this decision would then be up to the Leg-

islative Assembly. Next week, I'll be looking at the island's executive, the people who make the policy decisions about how the island should be run, and in particular, the details of the Ministerial system proposed under a new Con-

# New staff, changes and renovations

TIME for another round up of what is happening and covering the many things that are happening in Health and Social Services which are not covered in our usual

First of all, forthcoming staff changes. At the end of this month we will have a new, female, doctor arriving - Dr Deirdre McCormack She trained in Ireland and has most recently worked in Australia. At the same time we will also see the arrival of a long-term locum dentist. Stefanie Toerien from South Africa will be with us for three months, while we recruit permanent replacements for Drs David Fyfe and Sally Owen who have both completed their contracts. In June she will be joined by Dr Mark Vardon from London who will be with us for a month. We hope to have permanent dentists arriving in July

We are currently advertising for a replacement Medical Engineer and hope to have that post filled in the next few months to relieve the pressure on our hard-pressed Engineering Dept

Lastly, the Director of Health and Social Services. Norman McGregor Edwards, leaves in mid-May on completion of his contract and we expect his successor to arrive at the end of June

Those of you who have visited the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital(KEMH) recently will have noticed quite a few changes.

As reported previously, the Isolation Unit attached to the North East corner of the KEMH is now up and running.

The internal works for the new maternity unit and the renovated Intensive Care Unit are nearly completed. They are now being decorated and should be ready for use in two weeks

On visiting the hospital ward you will see new vertical panels by each bedhead containing the new medical gases supply, the new nurse call system and the new patient services (light and electrical sockets etc). There has also been a lot of preparatory work going on much of it in the roof - to modify the heating, electrical and medical gas supply systems ready for the new arrangements.

Starting on May 9, some of the long term residents of KEMH will be moved to different rooms from time to time to allow work to start on the long-awaited Elderly Care Ward. This will consist of seven rooms (or six with a day room) which will allow our permanent residents to have the privacy and dignity of their own rooms. That should be completed at the end of

The final parts of the project. the replacement of the ward fire alarm system and finishing of decoration and minor works, should be completed by the end of Septem-

Whilst all the construction work has been going on, we have had a number of ward beds out of use and so we have deliberately tried to keep non-urgent surgery to a minimum From October onwards, though, we will see our visiting specialists from the UK down here again, including a cataract surgeon and orthopaedics specialist.

All of this could not have happened of course, without the hard work of all the contractors staff and the patience and hard work of the KEMH staff who have been cheerfully carrying on as normal (or as nearly as possible) whilst all this has been going on.

And the final result of all this work? A renovated ward, Maternity Unit and Intensive Care Unit. upgraded fire alarm and medical gas supplies, better bedhead services for patients, a new Isolation Unit and the Islands first Elderly Care Nursing facility.

# Freezer-friendly recipes for the Falklands Woman's Own tomato and basil slice

Ingredients

375g packet ready-rolled puff pastry

40g tomatoes, thinly sliced 2 garlic cloves, peeled and thinly sliced

Itbsp olive oil

large handful small fresh basil leaves

Soured cream

Method

Preheat the oven to Gas Mark 6. Carefully unroll the sheet of puff pastry and place on a baking sheet. Prick the pastry all over with a fork.



Arrange the tomato slices over the pastry sheet then sprinkle with the garlic. Season well, then drizzle with the olive oil.

Bake in the preheated oven for 35-40 minutes, or until the pastry has risen and golden and the to-matoes are golden round the edges.

Serve or allow to cool before freczing

Can be frozen for up to two months wrapped in foil or clingfilm (either whole or in two pieces.)

To serve, heat through from frozen in an oven preheated to Gas Mark 4 for 20 minutes or until piping hot.

#### Less hydatids but more cash into Camp

THE number of confirmed Hydatid cysts found in sheep processed through the Sand Bay abattoir this season are expected to be less than last year.

Several cysts which were initially thought to be hydatid were later found to be bladder cysts embedded in the liver. Senior Veterinary Officer Steve Pointing told the Agricultural Advisory Committee this week that there is a possibilthat some have misdiagnosed in previous years.

There has only been one positive cyst this season with six the previous season. Mr Pointing said that having recently seen the updated information leaflets from New Zealand and Australia on hydatid control, they contain, nothing that we aren't already doing here.

In an effort to put more cash into Camp and to service fencing and pasture improvement works, the hourly rate for the Labour Scheme has been increased from £5 per hour to £6.

The scheme which has been in operation since 2001 is to be used only for Camp-related works such as fencing, pasture improvement

work. (other than that undertaken on the Pasture Improvement Programme) and major building or de-

velopment projects.

Farmers will not be paid for work on their own farms but family members who are normally resident in Camp can work on the family farm, carning up to a ceiling of £2,000 per individual per annum. In special circumstances. Stanley residents will be permitted to work under the labour scheme.

A paper is to go to the next Executive Council meeting to recommend that a Biosecurity Officer be appointed to implement a number of functions suggested in the reof Falkland Islands view biosecurity systems.

It is proposed that the new post should be situated within the Department of Agriculture with the Senior Veterinary Officer as their

line manager.

Following concerns raised by a board member on the breeding objectives of the National Stud Flock (NSF) the Senior Agriculture Advisor Neil Judd is to prepare a report for the next meeting of the committee to explain the progress to date of the NSF.

#### Flying Falklands to Fairford for four months

AIRCRAFT from the Royal Air Force base of Brize Norton near Oxford will be operating from Fairford for a four month period at the end of the year.

For four months from November, the runway at Brize Norton is being resurfaced and all aircraft will be operating out of RAF Fairford. The Falklands Representative in the UK, Sukey Cameron, said passengers will check in at Brize Norton, "...as usual (perhaps a little earlier) and be transported to Fairford, some ten or so miles

The departure of this weekend's flight from the Falklands to Brize Norton has been delayed by one day due to a 'Stop the War' protest being held at the Oxfordshire base.

# Groups lobby to establish casino

A SPANISH and German group has joined the long list of hopefuls interested in a licence to establish a casino and other gambling activities in Punta Arenas.

Recent Chilean legislation opened up the possibility for a limited number of casinos (17), under certain conditions, with a maximum of three per region.

The only other casino in Magallanes is in Puerto Natales and the new bill authorises the city of Punta Arenas to establish a second gambling centre.

The Spanish group Cirsa man-

ages 52 casinos in Latinamerica, has an annual turnover of 150 million US dollars and told Punta Arenas officials they are interested in building a hotel with the casino and a conventions centre.

The German Group Hamburg Holding SA runs casinos in Europe and the head of the delegation vicepresident Arsen Premer from Croatia said that, "...it was a great moment to invest given the fast growing tourism industry in Chile."

Apparently Mr Premer owns 25 casinos in Croatia.

#### Equestrian endurance competition

#### Gas exploration in Tierra del Fuego

ENAP, Chile's government-owned petroleum company has expanded its area of exploration for natural gas in Tierra del Fuego.

The areas involved are Gobernador Philippi and San Gregorio, and they are part of the aggressive ENAP campaign to reduce its natural gas dependency

from an only source which has caused so many problems to Chile during the last two years.

The Chilean Congress is currently considering a bill to limit the gas supply from any one country to 85% with the purpose of diversifying the energy provision

However Magallanes authorities have requested the Chilean Congress add an amendment to the bill given the fact that the methanol industry next to Punta Arenas is virtually totally dependent from Argentina until alternative ENAP gas supplies can be discovered.

#### Closed stadium and recreational centre

CHILEAN private investors are planning the building of a closed multipurpose stadium with a capacity for 3,000 spectators.

The project will demand an in-

vestment of 1.2 million US dollars and will be undertaken by the Chilean Construction Chamber.

A delegation from the Chamber which flew in from Santiago said the main gymnasium will be full equipped with the purpose of serving as a recreational centre for Punta Arenas residents.

Private sector involvement will be supported by the national and regional government since the recreational activities are seen as an opportunity to combat obesity and alcoholism, two indexes where Punta Arenas figures among the worst cases in Chile.

# Legal submissions delay fishing verdict

DESCRIBED as a "case of great importance" the Senior Magistrate has adjourned the trial of Falklands company Quark Fishing Ltd and its Spanish partners Freirenger AS

Spanish partners Freiremar AS.
At the end of three days of witness testimonies, Mrs Clare Faulds said that, "in the greater interests of justice" she would require further legal submissions from counsel and adjourned the case.

Prosecutor Peter Cooke and defence counsel Fergus Randolph, both from the UK, departed the Islands yesterday and are to email their submissions to Mrs Faulds by the end of next week.

The case against Quark Fishing, of which Falklands councillor Mike Summers is Managing Director, and Freiremar AS centres around the activities of two longline fishing vessels. Jacqueline and Ibsa Quinto.

sels. Jacqueline and Ibsa Quinto.

Quark is 25.1% owned by Falklands residents and 74.9% owned by Freiremar. Quark owns and operates the Falklands-flagged Jacqueline. Freiremar owns the Spanish-flagged Ibsa Quinto, chartered in the 2004 South Georgia toothfish season by Quark.

In court this week, the *lbsa* Quinto was alleged to have overfished during South Georgia's 2004 season, exceeding her 300 tonne quota for Patagonian toothfish by approximately 10%. In 2004 the Government of

In 2004 the Government of South Georgia introduced a new licence condition which meant the quantities of toothfish catch would be inspected, either in Stanley or at King Edward Point (in the harbour of Cumberland Bay), South Georgia.

The prosecution told the court that on July 6 Ibsa Quinto became

the first vessel to have her catch monitored at FIPASS in Stanley. Only 'product', that is the processed torso of the fish, was to be weighed. 'Sub-product', such as fish collars, was not to be weighed.

The weighing procedure was carried out, taking around two and a half days to complete. Later on the third day, after the figures had been calculated, the level of product was found to be almost 19 tonnes over quota, equating to 33 tonnes of liveweight fish.

By the time the excess had been realised, *Ibsa Quinto* had left Stanley and the South Georgia Government recalled the vessel. The excess product was unloaded and charges were later laid against Freiremar and Quark

Ihsa Quinto moved to Montevideo later in July where her catch was offloaded, weighed and sold.

Giving evidence under oath, the Director of Fisheries, Miss Harriet Hall explained that a conversion factor of 1.75 was used in equating live weight from processed weight. For example, 10kgs of processed fishing, applying the conversion rate of 1.75 would equate to 17.5kgs of fish hauled from the sea

In cross examination, Mr Randolph brought to Miss Hall's attention a report from an observer aboard *Ibsa Quanto* which suggested a conversion rate of 1.71, based on the way the fish was being cut, would be appropriate. Miss Hall responded that vessels were expected to process their fish based on the rate agreed as part of a licence.

Miss Hall also spoke of a form of tolerance exercised by the Government of South Georgia for exceeding quotas. She said this level was, "...for our own internal working purposes; we would allow 5% either way." and commented that vessel owners were not informed of this as, "...we thought they would go for 4 999%."

Defence counsel. Mr Fergus Randolph, alleged that the *Ibsa Quinto*, being the first vessel to have its total catch weighed, had the "misfortune" of being "a guinea pig." He said the fact that two different monitoring regimes were in place (sampling in Cumberland Bay and actual weighing in Stanley) was "very surprising" and the Cumberland Bay sampling would be "less accurate by definition."

Mr Randolph said the tolerance factor being used to determine whether vessels had caught over their allocated quota was an "extremely important" issue, particularly when weights were more closely examined.

He argued that, bearing in mind ice could amount to 1-3% of the product weight and that, based on the weights calculated in Montevideo and using the 1.71 conversion figure suggested by *Ibsa Quinto's* observer, the final figure would come to only 6% over quota - "just 1% over the previously secret (tolerance on 5%").

Mr Randolph reminded the court that witnesses had testified to a number of possible flaws in the weighing procedure carried out at FIPASS, including the fact boxes were not individually checked and weighed, some sub-product had been mixed in with product during weighing, and the scales used were not zeroed every time a pallet of product was weighed. #### **Argentine protest**

ARGENTINA has protested against the inclusion of the Falklands Islands in the in EU constitution.

On Wednesday, Argentina officially rejected the inclusion of the Falkland Islands, South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands as "British Antarctic Territory" in the European Union Constitutional Treaty and has informed European institutions of its "reservations" about the case.

"Malvinas (sie) are not a territory where the new European Constitution is applicable," said the Argentine Foreign Affairs Ministry in a release

Annex II of Title IV, Part III of the EU Constitutional Treaty signed last October 29 includes the Falklands, South Georgia and South Sandwich as "British Antarctic Territory".

Through its embassy in Brussels, the Argentine Foreign Affairs Ministry has filed the "corresponding reservations" before European institutions.

Councillor Norma Edwards said Legislative Council has spoken about the protest and, "...refutes absolutely what Argentina is saying." She said, "...we are clear on

She said, "...we are clear on where we stand and the British government is clear on our status and I'm sure that the British Government will reply to this in that vein."

Acting Governor Hall yesterday confirmed the Foreign Office will respond in some way to the protest: "The UK's views are well known and the Foreign Office will ensure that these are registered appropriately."

#### Roof cost: £½ million

THE new roof on Stanley's Town Hall has cost £536,000.

Councillor Roger Edwards told a public meeting on Tuesday that he believed the cost had been in the region of £300,000 however he corrected this yesterday.

He described the revised sum as "ridiculously high" but added, "that's the market forces of today." He said the fact the roof has been built on to an old building has added to the overall cost. More news from the public meeting is on page 2.

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# Sticky situation for seabirds after reefer's grounding

A NUMBER of oiled seabirds have been found, dead and alive, near Kidney Cove after fuel was leaked following the grounding of the reefer Nova Scotia last week.

This Rockhopper penguin (pictured right shortly after his discovery) was cleaned by staff from Falklands Conservation and the Veterinary Department (far right) before being released yesterday morning.

More than twenty dead sooty shearwaters were found near the landing beach at Kidney Cove that showed obvious signs of oiling and smelled of diesel oil.

# Mixed bag at the public meeting

A LAST minute change of venue was probably to blame for a low turn out of members of the community at the councillor's monthly public meeting held in the Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday evening.

However, although there were only around twenty members of the public at the meeting, a mix of issues was discussed.

The final route for the Murrel Road was the first item put to the table of seven councillors; one member of the public expressed concern over the length of time that the Murrel Road has been an issue.

Councillor Luxton said that there had never been any intention to complete the road during the last road building season and that, regardless of what route is decided upon, there is time for all the necessary planning applications to be completed by the new season.

The early closure of the illex season will affect the budgetary procedure because of license refunds. Councillor Cockwell told the meeting. He said the budget would have to be based on a season the same as this one or a bit better.

Councillor Cockwell said that "several million" had been spent on refunds but that it was not as much as last year.

With regard to the recent 20% increase in loligo licenses for the second season Councillor Cockwell said it was thought that the industry could cope with the increase as, "...it is a healthy industry."

Councillor Roger Edwards said that Falkland Landholdings (FLH) is not a good example to the rest of the farming community, some of whom are doing "exceptionally

well "

FLH has had all the same advice that has been offered to farmers, "no capital costs and no debts" he said. However Councillor Edwards added he had every confidence that the managers would sort it out.

Councillor Cockwell, Chairman of FLH, said that a meeting had been held with farm managers and they were working together to make proposals for change.

Concern was expressed by several members of the public over the lack of apprenticeships on offer within FIG resulting in a shortage of skilled workers in some depart-

ments

Councillors felt that many of the people who would normally have taken up apprenticeships were now going on to further education but the situation would be looked into.

#### **Court news**

#### Custodial sentence considered for You

A MAN from Mount Pleasant has had his case adjourned to allow for the preparation of a pre-sentence report.

Mr Barry Charles Yon was found guilty of assault and threatening to kill late last week and is to reappear in court on June 8 for sentencing by Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds.

Mr Yon had pleaded guilty to a charge of possession of a bladed article, but not guilty to charges of threatening to kill and common assault.

The court heard from Crown Prosecution Ros Cheek how on two separate occasions Mr Yon's ex partner Genieve Flaine Youde, had feared for her safety because of Mr Yon's behaviour, including an incident in which he showed her he was carrying a knife.

Miss Youde reported the incidents to the Police on February 26.

Mr Yon took the stand during his trial and explained that during the first incident Miss Yon had become angry during a conversation and had hit out at him; he said he put his hands up to protect his face and she had fallen against the wall and to the ground. He said he offered to pick her up and they went their own ways

On the second occasion Mr Yon said he had been out then went to his room and picked up a knife, and went to Miss Youde's room. Mr Yon said he had wanted to talk to Miss Youde because he missed her, he said they had planned to get married next year. He said he did not know why he took the knife with him, had not deliberately shown the knife to Miss Youde and had made no threats; he said he had only spoke of giving their relationship a chance.

Ms Cheek put it to Mr Yon that it is not normal to take a knife "when you are visiting someone you are in love with" and that even if his mind had "gone blank" for a moment, the 15 - 20 minute journey from his room to Miss Youde's was time to think about what he was

In closing Mr Marlor said he disagreed with the prosecutions point we don't hurt those we that, " love: he said we sometimes want to hurt people because of how they have hurt us, but "we don't do it; as Mr Yon didn't do it.

Mrs Faulds said she had reviewed the evidence carefully and was considering a custodial sentence. She said that she was unsure of the words used to threaten, and to fulfil the requirements for the offence to be carried out she would have to be certain that Miss Yon was in fear of her life. Mrs Faulds asked that a pre-sentence report be prepared prior to sentencing on June 8, 2005.

#### Bound over after 'taking a swing'

STANLEY man Gary McGill was bound over to keep the peace for one year to the sum of £100 and fined £100 plus £70 prosecution costs after he pleaded guilty to a charge of assault.

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek told the court how Mr McGill had hit Mr Roy McKay in the face shortly after entering Deanos on the evening of April 1. She said that Mr McKay received injuries later that night during another incident which did not involve Mr McGill and which is still being dealt with within the court.

The court heard that Mr McGill had been in a long term relationship with Cara McGill with whom he has a two year old son - although they had never married Ms McGill had her name changed by deed poll.

Defence lawyer Mr Ian Warburton said that as his client entered Deanos Bar he was aware of a group sitting just inside the door consisting of Ms McGill her current boyfriend Mr McKay and Ms McGill's mother. He said that he was aware of comments and laughter directed at him, so he walked across and "took a swing" at Mr McKay

Mr Warburton said that notwithstanding any comments made, Mr McGill admitted it was an unprovoked punch and a "foolish action" and that he was remorseful for his behaviour.

Mrs Faulds bound Mr McGill over to keep the peace for one year. in general and in particular towards Mr McKay.

Also in court on Thursday, Mr Gavin Browning received a citable caution following the theft of a packet of cigarettes from Beauchene and Mr David Martin Crowie was refused an application for the return of his driving license.

Mr Crowie was disqualified from driving in July 2004 following a drink driving offence. Mrs Faulds said that his circumstances have not been affected by his not having a license and she could see no reason why it should be restored.

#### Alleged young brawlers cases adjourned

Ryan MFIVYN Clifton. Hawksworth and Mervyn Richard Lee appeared in court on Thursday facing charges of affray along with John David Toby McKay who faced a charge of assault occasioning actual bodily harm. The charges all pertain to an incident which took place on March 17

Mr Clifton and Mr Lee were represented by Mr Richard Marlor while Mr Hawksworth and Mr McKay are represented by Mr Ian Warburton; no pleas were entered although Mr Marlor intimated it was unlikely his clients would plead guilty.

Ryan Hawksworth appeared again with Andrew James MacDonald and Christopher William Saunders facing charges relating to an incident which occurred on April 1.

Defence lawyer Ian Warburton asked for an adjournment when he assured the court that the case would be bought to a conclusion.

Both groups will reappear in court on May 4.

#### Lavinia pays £1.26m for SSL shares

AFTER almost twenty years as exclusive bunkering contractor for Falklands-based Stanley Services Ltd (SSL). Athens-based reefer-operator Lavinia Corporation has been admitted to a 25.1% share in the company

Lavinia joins the original share-holders, the Falkland Islands Govemment (FIG) and S and I D Robertson Group, as part of a complex new arrangement negotiated over many months and which were concluded on March 30, 2005. A new 10 year fuel licence has been granted to SSL.

The government confirmed it has received payment of £1.26m for part of its shareholding, "...thus beginning to fulfil a long held publicly stated ambition to disengage from part ownership of SSL.

Councillor Norma Edwards yesterday said, "The deal's been done but the finer points are to be sorted. The majority of councillors were in agreement with the deal.

Councillor Jan Cheek was opposed to the sale of shares to Lavinia and said she was "pretty much in the dark" about the process.

She said although she had been aware of the "lengthy and expensive (in terms of legal advice) negotiations" that had gone on, the first confirmation she had that the sale had been finalised, "...was when I read it in Penguin News."

Mrs Cheek said she opposed the sale on two main points. "I think it unwise to put our fuel supply company into majority overseas ownership. I believe that everyone in the Falklands should have had the first opportunity to buy the shares.

Additionally, she said, "No one was able to persuade me that FIG would be better off in the long term after the receipt of 'one off' pavments for the share sales than it has been while receiving sizeable annual dividends.

Councillor Edwards argued that the Falklands have always relied on fuel supply from an overseas owner: "It's either the military that has provided it or the FIC (who have their main offices in the UK). In my opinion, we've got more of a handle on it now than we've ever had before.

FIG's remaining shares, which amount to 44.9% ownership of SSL. are to be transferred to a holding company which will be formed for the purpose and shares in the holding company (and therefore SSL) are to be exclusively offered for sale to Falkland Islanders. The government says work on this process will begin shortly

Stanley Services is the exclusive supplier of all petroleum products within the Falkland Islands and their territorial waters. Hitherto this exclusivity has been sub-contracted to Lavinia as regards bunkering. As part of the new arrangement, this role will be performed by a new Falklands based company, Stanley Bunkering Ltd, which is a joint venture between Lavinia and SSL with the latter building to a maximum holding of 35% over a number of years.

Chief Executive of the Falkland Islands Government, Mr Chris Simpkins, said, "FIG is pleased to welcome the Lavinia Corporation as a shareholder in SSL thus cementing mutually beneficial business arrangements that have existed for many years. Stanley Services has been a Falklands success story since its formation in 1987. It will now enter a new and important phase in its development with a much greater involvement than hitherto in bunkering which is so important to the key Falklands fishing industry."

#### Falklands Finest now a mark of origin

AS REPORTED in Penguin News last week, Falkland Islands products will soon be recognisable wherever they end up in the world, thanks to a new mark of origin developed from the Falklands Finest logo.

The Falkland Islands mark of origin is designed' to be used on as wide a range of Falklands products and services as possible. It will bear the same tussac leaf image as the Falklands Finest logo, with the words "Falkland Islands" beneath.

Anyone who is selling goods of Falklands origin or providing services in the Islands will be eligible to use the easy-to-recognise sign on their packaging or promotional literature. They will be asked to sign up to a simple charter, informing FIDC which products it will be used on, pledging their commitment to quality and agreeing to only use the mark on goods which are substantially of Falklands origin.

The logo will be free to use, although individuals will be responsible for incorporating it into their own packaging/materials etc. It will be appropriate for local use by pro-ducers, retailers and those involved in the tourism and hospitality market, as well as by exporters of wool, meat, fish, etc.

Sue Gyford from the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) said: "We hope the mark will enable us- FALKLANDS ers to capitalise on



growing awareness of the Falklands around the world as a producer of quality wool, food and other goods, as well as its place as a unique tourist destination.

"We want to make the most of the extensive work which went into developing the Falklands Finest brand, while making it as accessible as possible to potential users.

The artwork is being finalised and will be available to interested businesses and individuals shortly. While the Falkland Islands mark will be introduced first, FIDC says the Falklands Finest quality mark remains "on the table" for future development.

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# Oiled birds discovered after reefer grounding

FOLLOWING the grounding of the reefer vessel Nova Scotia on Cochon Island last week and the subsequent leakage of heavy fuel oil from a damaged tank, a number of dead and oiled birds were reported from Kidney Island and Cape Pembroke over the weekend.

During a brief visit to Kidney Island last Friday. April 22, Falklands Conservation recorded over twenty dead sooty shearwaters adjacent to the landing beach that showed obvious signs of oiling and smelled of diesel oil.

A further oiled sooty shearwater was found alive but in poor condition and a Magellanic penguin was observed with oil around its head and back. In addition reports were also received that a severely oiled imperial shag and rockhopper penguin had been observed on Cape Pembroke.

Grant Munro, Director of Falklands Conservation says these findings highlight the "significant risk to seabirds" that surface oil pollution presents even on a relatively

minor scale.

Thank fully the incidence of oiled seabirds observed in the Falklands is low, possibly due to the oceanic nature of the waters and the relatively low shipping activity; however this does not mean that the risk does not exist. Mr Munro reported that, in the adjacent waters of Argentina, it is estimated from beach counts of oiled birds that 40,000 Magellanic penguins die annually as a result of

contamination with oil. "In the long term the possibility of future oil exploration in the Falklands may form a significant potential source of contamination and the ongoing fishing industry with associated transhipment and fuel bunkering in coastal waters, as evidenced by the present incident and the grounding of a ship off FIPASS earlier in the year, constitute an ongoing risk."

Falklands Conservation has mapped the vulnerability of seabirds to oil pollution through the year utilising at-sea surveys. Mr Munro says this has shown February to be the most critical month and July to be the month of lowest vulnerability, however. "...in inshore waters vulnerability is high at all times of year due to the resident coastal species.

"Around the coasts of Berkeley Sound there are an estimated 2,512 gentoo penguins, 5.192 rockhopper penguins, over 50,000 sooty shearwaters, as well as white-chinned petrels, great shearwaters, greybacked storm-petrels, rock shags and imperial shags."

The majority of deaths attributable to oil pollution amongst seabirds. Mr Munro says, are due to the physical properties of the oil rather than due to ingestion. "Oiling destroys the water repellent properties of the birds' plumage. This allows water to penetrate, decreasing buoyancy, and causing water logging of plumage and drowning.

ging of plumage and drowning.
"Additionally, at reduced levels

of contamination thermal insulation is reduced requiring greater use of energy to combat cold leading to reduced fat reserves, muscle weakening and death.

ing and death.

"Feeding and foraging patterns of different species will also determine the degree of contact with contaminated surfaces. Many species may be affected by spills far removed from the breeding colonies and it is not necessary for oil to reach shore for an effect to be felt even though it might be out of sight."

Diving seabirds and coastal waterfowl that spend most of their time on the surface of the water are particularly vulnerable and less able to avoid the effects of pollution, Mr Munro says. Small oil slicks drifting through concentrations of birds resting on the sea may inflict heavy casualties disproportionate to the quantity of oil. "This may be the case with rafting seabirds in inshore waters as they return to or leave the breeding colonies as evidenced by the high incidence of oiled sooty shearwaters."

Falklands Conservation says oil may also affect plankton, fish eggs and larvae even at relatively low concentrations as low molecular weight hydrocarbons dissolve in the water. "Plankton, fish eggs and fish larvae are more sensitive than adults and have higher than normal mortalities if exposed to concentrations of 0.005 - 0.015 parts per million. Fish and squid populations

may be affected in the longer term through pollution of their spawning grounds and effects on eggs, egg laying substrates or food supply of surface phytoplankton.

Mr Munro says Falklands Conservation is content that on this occasion, given the location, prevailing weather conditions and the situation of the vessel that all that could be done was done in a timely fashion and would like to thank all those that worked together to reduce the severity of the leak and thus minimise any impact. He commented, "The Oil Pollution Contingency Plan appeared to work and the Fisheries Department liaised with all parties to ensure that everyone was informed.

"However, Falklands Conservation urge a note of caution as there appears to be a tendency, as evidenced in the information supplied in last weeks *Penguin News*, to understate the inherent risks to the environment. This may have been to prevent public worry but we hope that it will not stand in the way of carrying out a full internal review of the event so that mistakes and successes can be recorded and learned from and "what if" scenarios addressed."

He says gaps in the Contingency Plan, available materials and knowledge should be identified, "...so that we are better able to address the next incident that will surely occur."

He said there was no evidence from the prosecution as to why there was a large discrepancy between the weights measured in Stanley and Montevideo.

Mr Randolph said it was very difficult for the court to say that the figures show the *lbsa Quinto*'s catch to have been a definite amount over quota and that the weight found to exist in Stanley, "does not stand up beyond reasonable doubt."

The Senior Magistrate said she would require further information relating to the "law of tolerance" and requested written submissions from counsel by the end of next week.

Jacqueline's charge

The case against Jacqueline, that she failed to meet conservation measures required under her licence, Mr Randolph said, had not been proven by the prosecution.

Jacqueline was alleged to have conducted her fishing operations in breach of licence conditions through non-compliance with conservation

measures intended to reduce seabird mortality. The measures come under the Convention for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources (CCAMLR).

The Captain of Jacqueline was cautioned by Fishery Officer Steve Waugh on June 6, after the officer found the vessel to have been in breach of licence conservation meas-

Mr Waugh said he found the streamer line, a tool used to scare seabirds away from the vessel, did not meet the specified requirements. He also discovered offal mixed with monofilament and hooks caught in a scupper which lead directly to the sea and hooked mackerel bait which he was concerned was being purposely discharged overboard, presenting a danger to scabirds.

In cross examination, Mr Waugh was asked about a number of ships he had inspected during the season which he also found to have breached conservation measures with their bird scarers but which he had not cau-

tioned or prosecuted.

He replied that a pragmatic approach had to be taken and reiterated it was not only the *lbsa Quinto's* bird scarer that had breached conservation measures. When asked if he had a vendetta against *Jacqueline*, Mr Waugh replied, "absolutely not".

Juan Carlos Blanco, fleet man-

Juan Carlos Blanco, fleet manager for Freiremar, testified through a translator that the lump of offal, monofilament and hooks seen by Mr Waugh could not have physi ally fallen through the scupper to the outside sea. He also said the hooked mackerel bait which Mr Waugh discovered had probably been put "out of the way" during hauling and the hooks would be removed later. He denied that the hooked bait was to be disposed of in the sea.

Also giving evidence for the defence was Mr Mike Summers, Managing Director of Quark Fishing. He was asked by Mr Randolph about the departure from the company of the Captain of the Jacqueline, who left the company after last season.

Mr Summers said he had spoken to the former captain on a number of occasions and the gentlemen was of the view that the Jacqueline was "constantly discriminated against and harassed". Mr Summers added, "he (the captain) said the problem was probably me."

Mr Summers added that he did not subscribe to that view.

Summing up, the defence's arguments, Mr Randolph said that while he was not suggesting Mr Waugh was acting with some kind of hidden agenda, "...what he saw didn't correspond to reality," and he reminded the court that no seabirds had actually been caught by Jacqueline.

Mr Randolph said the prosecution had failed to prove the breach of conservation measures and had attempted to tarnish Quark Fishing with, "...the brush of sloppiness."

Verdicts in these cases against Quark Fishing and Freiremar SA are expected to be announced by the Senior Magistrate within the next few weeks.

#### ANZAC Day remembered in Stanley

NEW ZEALANDERS and Australians living in the Falklands gathered with friends around the Cenotaph near Stanley Cemetery on Monday for a dawn service to commemorate ANZAC Day.

This year marked the 90th Anniversary of the Gallipoli landings.

The quiet but poignant service, organised by Australian Steve Dent, was attended by approximately two dozen people.

Acting Governor Harriet Hall

and Steve Dent laid wreaths on the Cenotaph and prayers were lead by the Reverend Paul Sweeting.

New Zealander Trisha Grant and Australian Deborah Davis both spoke briefly on the meaning of ANZAC

A minute's silence took place and Paul Freer played the Last Post and Reveille. He also rounded off the service with the British National Anthem, God Save the Queen.

#### Military comes to Shaun's rescue

THE Royal Air Force's search and rescue team came to the aid of a young Falkland Islander at the weekend.

On Sunday afternoon, the Search and Rescue (SAR) team based at MPA, were told that seven-year-old Shaun Evans of South Harbour had just been involved in a quad bike accident and urgently needed medical assistance.

The SAR team, along with Squadron Leader Ian Mullan, the Mount Pleasant doctor, were immediately contacted and deployed to the Evans' home where they received the casualty.

Shaun was then flown towards King Edward VII Memorial Hospital in Stanley to be treated, however due to the nature of his injuries it was believed wise to take him straight to Mount Pleasant where the dentist, Flight Lieutenant Matt Friend, was on call.

A military spokesperson said a local anaesthetic was immediately administered and Shaun was given a thorough check up before Fit Lt Friend made the decision that Shaun would need to go under a general anaesthetic to alleviate the problem.

Fit Lt Friend and SAC Dani Baggaley then took Shaun to Stanley. On arrival at KEMH Shaun was given a general anaesthetic and Fit Lt Mark Friend duly extracted two of Shaun's teeth. One of Shaun's teeth was splinted and saved; however the other was unable to be treated. Fit Lt Mark

Friend and DAC Dani Baggaley then returned to Mount Pleasant, arriving in the early hours of the moming.

Flt Lt Mark Friend said the whole operation went like clock work: "Shaun had received dreadful trauma to his mouth and I was only to pleased to help him out.

"He was extremely brave throughout the incident and I wish him the best of luck with his further recovery."

Shaun's mother, Donna, said she was grateful to everyone involved in Shaun's recovery: "It was early evening on a Sunday so we really appreciated their quick response. The accident happened at 4.45pm and the helicopter was on our lawn by 7.00pm."

She said that although Shaun has lost one of his adult teeth as a result of the accident, "...he's doing all right.

He's feeling a bit sorry for himself - he's got stitches on the outside and inside of his lip - but he's doing really well."

She added. "I'd like to thank the SAR team, the MPA dental staff and the theatre and nursing staff from KEMH. Everyone went the full mile for us which was really appreciated.

Donna said the whole incident was, "very scary and I was very stressed out" but "they looked after us all really well."

She added, "I'm not sure if Shaun's going quad riding for a while now!

#### Prince Charles and Dame Ellen save the albatross

THE Prince of Wales and record breaking yachtswoman Ellen McArthur have joined the bid to save the albatross.

Longline fishing, much of it by illegal pirates, has put 19 of the 21 species of albatross at risk of extinction and has also caused massive declines in the numbers of Patagonian toothfish and several species of tuna fish.

At a special gala dinner on Wednesday the Prince of Wales rallied support for Operation Ocean Task Force, a new RSPB (Royal Society for the Protection of Birds) initiative to appoint a team of experts to train fishermen on how best to prevent seabird deaths. Dr Ben Sullivan, formerly from the Falklands Conservation Sea Birds at Sea Team, is now based with the RSPB in the UK.

This week, Prince Charles commented, "To me the albatross may be the ultimate test of whether or not, as a species ourselves, we are serious about conservation: capable of coexisting on this planet with another species."

Dame Ellen explained how she had albatrosses accompany her on many occasions during her recent record setting around the world trip, "...they certainly gave me company on a very solitary trip. I hope we still have the opportunity now to save these magnificent creatures before it is too late."

She said she believes that saving the albatross is critically important, "The albatross is one of the most amazing birds in existence; it is truly breathtaking."

Many programmes around the world place observers on vessels to monitor and record seabird bycatch, however, there is a shortage of qualified at sea practitioners to train fishers in the adoption of appropriate mitigation measures.

The memorial service for Lt Nick Taylor RN will commence at 2pm at the graveside situated beside the Goose Green airfield.

The service is organised each year by Mrs June McMullen. Reverend Paul Sweeting of Christ Church Cathedral assisted by other Stanley Clergy and the Forces Chaplain, will conduct the cer-

emony. For those not familiar with Goose Green, approximately one hour should be allowed to travel from Mount Pleasant.

To reach the grave, turn right on to the Goose Green by-pass before you reach the settlement, the grave is on the right after about 300 metres.

Everyone attending is advised to take warm clothing as the site is exposed.

#### FLH: One stop management group?

ROBIN Goodwin's first letter about Falklands Landholdings (FLH) did not really go anywhere for me; I couldn't quite grasp the objective of advocating stopping FLH's subsidy whilst suggesting that 'support packages' would be needed for any supposed section takers in a land split-up.

But his second letter *does* merit some support and, though 1 have never discussed FLH (or very much else with him, for some time), my views echo his comments.

I won't belabour the details (many would say a lot could have been saved and sorted on a couple of occasions, with a plane ticket and a well-aimed boot) but I agree entirely that whilst maybe the, 'What you should have done' approach may be dismissed and regarded as unconstructive by anyone embarrassed by historical facts, there is complete truth in the adage. 'Those who do not learn from their mistakes are most certainly condemned to repeat them.'

Much unfortunately goes wrong for such a corporation through its public ownership. Scrutiny of its affairs, true or guessedat has led to a perception that topheavy management is the only way to ensure transparency and best practise.

To quote one of our elected members, "Governments are notoriously bad at running things..."

A lot of good independent folk have done time on that board; I only know of one who has not been somewhat disillusioned by the experience.

The suggestion that the board has never really taken control of financial affairs is spot-on. The political and sociological issues surrounding any whiff of a radical shake-up and commercially-orientated make-over takes it right back into the minefield of retreat: "Oh, we don't want to do that...Not really an option..." becomes a polite way of saying "shut up" and all this in turn prevents the company

from being run with some of the flexibility of owner-operator farms.

It does nothing for monthly or seasonal management to have to wait for board decisions that require instant action, but in the past, it probably has helped to circumvent some potentially catastrophic livestock management proposals based upon some well-intentioned, but grossly inexperienced corporate logic.

To the best of my knowledge, the board has never ever been presented with comparison figures for its wool sale options used during the period of the recent accounts, no matter how often they were re-

quested.

Perhaps it is time for the sections to be run independently; at very least with the managers forming the core of a one-stop management group. (Financial responsibility at the same level as FIG section heads, independent but fully accountable business plans. produce selling and requisites purchasing, hire/fire, sink or swim, with final ownership/asset responsibility staying with LegCo/SFC where it has always really been; annual review).

This is well out of order, way too far out and would be totally unacceptable to many, so I'll expect a slamming for it.

The one thing that really needs to be borne in mind is that at the current rate of worldwide rural population decline, we are not immune to change ourselves. Any future planning and activity needs to be made around minimalist people numbers. I mean, let's face it, current education curriculums, employment opportunities and life aspirations don't exactly do anything to cut the flow from Camp or encourage interest in rural activity in a lot of young folk these days, do they?

However, a computer game is about to be launched about the war, with a subtitle "History made fun" and with such choice descriptions as "replicating everything from small arms fire-fights to bayonet charges".

To indicate what the effect this is causing to many of the veterans, I can but quote part of a message on my desk this morning: exactly

"when i seen that this game was being sold i cried my brothers are worth more their memory is immortalised in the fact the Falkland Islands still have there freedom and will continue to do so"

Many other veterans are also

appalled at the bad taste involved in making a profit out of their suffering and having the sacrifice of so many lives trivialised in this way when the pain and agony, physical and mental, is still so fresh.

This weekend the families of those who died will be holding their annual service of reunion when they gather to remember those that laid down their lives in the service of their country in 1982. At the end of the service, a retiring collection is taken to go to Combat Stress, the Ex-Service Mental Welfare Society.

I can only hope that the producers of the game, the ProSIM Company, will put their profits into this, or any of the ex-service charities that do so much good in looking after those who have been damaged mentally or physically in fighting for their country.

Q How much was paid for Falklands Landholdings (FLH) at the time of purchase and how much of the purchase price was written off? What additional funding has been given over the years?

Our thanks to General Manager of Landholdings, Mr Owen Summers, for providing the answers to this series of questions.

A FIG paid £5.2m plus £1 m operating costs for the farms, as a loan initially, but this was later written off.

Since then a further £1.136m has been provided (£0.575m for asset restoration and pension fund) the remainder has been in the form of wool subsidies and other grants on the same basis as other farms, grants were at a much reduced rate in the majority of cases.

Q What were the then cattle and sheep numbers and how many cattle and sheep are on Falklands Landholdings land to date?

A The FLH farms covering an area of 320348 Ha were purchased from FIC with 207993 sheep and 1425 cattle (Bleaker Island area and stock excluded in this summary). In the not too distant past the board of the day made a conscious decision to reduce stock numbers, a trend which has since been reversed, and at the 31st May 2004 FLH had stock numbers of 174692 sheep and 940 cattle, however by this time the area farmed by FLH had also been reduced to 295720 Ha. In addition to this the structure of the FLH flocks have changed, in 1991 the overall stocking rate was 0.80 DSE/Ha and at the 31st May 04 it was 0.74 DSE/IIa.

#### Q How many employees were there at takeover and how many are there today?

A In 1991 FLH had 62 employees, during the 2003/04 financial FLH had 46 employees of which 15 would have been either part time or seasonal staff. This does not include contract shearers or Stanley Dairy employees.

# Q How much is paid in Directors fees and all salaries?

A Other than staff members whose salaries are considered directors remuneration, there are no directors fees.

The total wages, salaries and pension costs for FLH employees during the last financial year was £511.091 which includes those staff members who are also directors. Stanley Dairy employees excluded.

Q What is the annual income and expenditure of FLH?

A During the financial year 2003/04 FLH had a gross income of £1.212K and a total expenditure of £1.605K both of which exclude Stanley Dairy.



Q WHAT is the incidence of Aspergers Syndrome, in both adults and children, in the Islands?

Thanks to Dr Roger Diggle for supplying the following answer

A Asperger's syndrome is a spectrum from normal at one end of the scale to severely handicapped at the other and includes Autism and autistic spectrum disorders. So, the incidence depends upon precisely where one draws the line between normal and pathological.

I guess the questioner is asking how many persons have severe enough Asperger's syndrome so that it causes problems for the person and requires some degree of extra assistance.

As far as I am aware, there are four adults with Asperger's syndrome, all of whom are functioning normally within the community but have needed extra help at school.

This help has varied from extra assistance with learning and reading to requiring a special needs assistant.

I believe that there are six children that I know of with definite Asperger's syndrome, sufficiently severe that they require special needs assistance within school or will do when they are old enough to attend school.

There are at least another six children who have milder degrees of Asperger's syndrome that contributes to their learning difficulty but is relatively mild.

Q FOLLOWING on from the news about the grounding of the vessel Nova Scotia in Berkeley Sound resulting in an oil leak, would it be right to assume that the owners of the vessel will be fined for the subsequent pollution caused by this oil leak?

Mr John Barton, Director of Fisheries, provided the following response.

A Where there are cases of oil pollution, we (Fisheries Department) will seek to gather evidence.

Whether charges are pressed is a matter for the Attorney General following consideration of the circumstances of a particular case.

Any fine or penalty is a matter for the Court in cases which are proven. That all applies to oil pollution in the marine environment generally, and does not refer to a specific case.

### Obituary: Pat Lee remembered

PAT Lee was born in Portsmouth in 1939. He arrived in the Falklands in 1957 to work at Dunnose Head Farm.

He worked under Bill Paice and later married Bill's youngest daughter, Joan, in 1962. They moved to Little Chartres where Pat worked as a shepherd for seven years and in 1963 they had their only child Derek.

Pat then moved to Fox Bay East to work and worked there for a further five years before leaving with his family for New Zealand in 1974 where they stayed for three years. Pat worked in a factory making chain link fencing before moving back to the United Kingdom in 1977.

He then spent some time working for Lou Edwards, cutting down trees and making fencing pales. (Lou Edwards was the uncle of Roger Edwards who worked for Packe Brothers in the Falklands in the 1950's). Pat then got a job on a stud farm and spent 19 years working at Uplands Park in Surrey breeding racehorses, a job he loved and was very enthusiastic about.

He got to meet lots of famous jockeys and impressed me by receiving Christmas cards from the likes of Willie Carson! I have fond memories of spending time at the stud with Pat and of being taken to Goodwood races and getting into the owners enclosure with him.

Pat had a natural talent for working with horses. Another talent was one he never readily admitted to but he was a very good artist and cartoonist. This was nothing more than a hobby to Pat but he could easily have made it so much more. Among other things he designed the front cover of R E Edwards' book *The Other Side of The Falklands* and his sketches were used throughout the book.

Pat could tell some good tales from his early days in the Falklands and his life in general; he could have written a book himself.

Pat left the stud in 1999 and decided to do some travelling. He visited the United States and was in the World Trade Centre the day before the 2001 terrorist attack.

Sadly, Pat passed away on April 15, 2005 after a long illness. He was forever cheerful and always had a great fondness for the Falkland Islands.

His home was always open to Falkland Islanders and he will be sadly missed by his son Derek and all those who knew him.

#### Thistle invasion and new power source

THE "thistle invasion" has been up for discussion by the Environmental Committee.

The thistle is now evident throughout Stanley with the main area being to the west of the Beaver Hangar. The prevailing west wind has assisted the spreading of this non native species.

Director of Conservation Grant

Director of Conservation Grant Munro told a meeting of the Committee on Monday that efforts to reduce the spread of the plant this year have not been a great success, mainly due to a late start with the necessary liasion required to carry out a control.

Mr Munro said that by the time stock was removed from paddocks it was too late for spraying as the seed head had already set and that attempts to burn both the established plant and the plucked seed heads and not been successful. He said the problem was greater than first thought and added that thistles had even been spotted recently on Steeple Jason.

Falklands Conservation plans to work closely with the Department of Agriculture to control the spread of the thistle which could have serious consequences for farmers were it to become established in areas where sheep are farmed for wool.

Also discussed at Monday's meeting was the environmental impact of a proposed wind farm consisting of three 300 kilowatt turbines in the Sand Bay area with concern being expressed by members for wildlife in the area.

Conservation Strategy Officer Andy Douse said that it is a general view that wind farms do have an impact on wildlife and that geese are particularly prone to colliding with turbines at dusk. He added however that the site selected was probably not a high risk area.

Environmental Planning Officer Dominique Guidicelli referred to the Falkland Islands Government proposed wind farm, which is designed to supplement and improve the efficiency of the towns power supply as "forward thinking" saying she would recommend that the application be approved at the next Planning and Building Committee meet-

# Focus on Aspergers and Autism Spectrum Disorders

APRIL is Autism Awareness Month in the US and Autism Awareness Week is in May in the UK.

The term Autism Spectrum Disorders or ASD is used to describe a family of developmental disorders where the main difficulties are in social interaction, communication. flexible thinking and imaginative play.

Autism Spectrum Disorders affect more children than Down Syndrome, hearing loss or vision impairment and Cerebral Palsy. In fact, they are the third most common developmental disability in children behind specific language impairment. ADHD and Learning disability. A recent study in the UK suggested that up to one in 86 children are affected by one of the forms of ASD. The term Autistic Spectrum Disorders includes Autism. Asperger's Syndrome. PPD-NOS (Pervasive Developmental Disorder not otherwise specified. Semantic Pragmatic Lan-guage disorder and Nonverbal Learning Disorder.

What Causes Autism Spectrum Disorders?

ASD is considered a developmental disorder meaning that it is something that you are born with and not the result of an illness or accident. No one knows exactly what causes Autistic Spectrum Disorders although the difficulties they cause are generally believed to be due to neurological differences in the brain that affect the way information is processed Although not considered to be directly inheritable, genetic influences do seem to play some part as there is a higher incidence of ASD or related difficulties in some families. Boys are up to 10 times more likely to be affected than girls.

llow is an Autistic Spectrum Disorder Diagnosed?

Autistic Spectrum Disorders are generally diagnosed in early child-

hood although with milder forms such as Aspergers and Semantic Pragmatic Language Disorder, diagnosis might be retrospective or never formally made. There is no definitive physical test for ASD like the blood sugar test for diabetes.

A diagnosis of Autistic Spectrum Disorder is usually made on the basis of a pattern of behaviours after a series of assessments and observations by a team of child development specialist including a paediatrician, psychologist, learning specialist and speech and language therapist. Typically young children with Autistic Spectrum Disorders present with delayed language and social communication skills, very immature and inflexible play skills and dif-ficult behaviour. However differential diagnosis can be difficult particu-larly in the very young child as the early symptoms of many developmental conditions overlap

Aspergers Syndrome

As there is not the space to give a detailed review of all of the Autistic Spectrum Disorders I will talk briefly about Aspergers Syndrome bearing in mind that each person even though diagnosed with Autism Spectrum disorders is an individual with a their own pattern of behaviours and strengths and weaknesses and all these traits are present in the 'normal' population in varying de-

In a very general sense, although people with Aspergers Syndrome are often quite articulate they can appear to have an 'odd' communication style- pedantic and lacking in social awareness or insight. They may have difficulty making friends. reading body language and thus knowing what to do in social situations. They are generally very honest but may lack social empathy or tact and find it difficult to conceptualise the

thoughts and feelings of others. They can have a deep interest and knowledge about a very particular topic of special interest to them and very original and creative thought patterns and yet have difficulty thinking flexibly and transferring skills learned in one setting to another.

They generally have a very good memory and may have good skills with computers, facts and figures. They can appear clumsy with an awkward gait and have difficulty with handwriting. They can show good attention to detail but have difficulty with organisation- collecting up the things they need and finishing tasks.

It is often difficult to make a definitive diagnosis until a child is nearer to school age

How can you help.

If you know someone who has an autistic spectrum disorder, you can be most helpful by finding out as much information as you can about autistic spectrum disorders in general and how people with ASD see the world

If you are able to put yourself in their shoes and understand a bit about why they are behaving or reacting in the way that they are then you will have a better idea of how to

If you want to find out more, there is a number of excellent sites on the internet which I am happy to provide information about. There are also a some very good books. There is one quite interesting book that is in the Community Library called "The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night time by Mark Haddon. It is a murder mystery written from the perspective of a 15 year boy with Aspergers Syndrome and gives a very interesting insight into how a person with Aspergers might think and view the world.

### Wool report - week ending April 22 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

QUITE significant currency movements during the last week affected greasy wool prices. As a consequence at the close of trading in South Africa, New Zealand and Australia prices were down by several pence per kilogram clean at the finer end of the micron spectrum and by one or two p/kg clean at the broader end.

Over 88% of wool offered to the trade changed hands in Australia, 95 % in South Africa and 81%

in New Zealand. "Modiano Wool" which pur-chased over 27% of the offering (2,339 bales) dominated South African buying. This is important news for Falkland Island farmers as Modiano is also a key purchaser of FI wool. It is good to see the company so active in the market! Broad buying interest was evident in Australia where the "top ten" buying houses purchased over 64% of the offering between them (Modiano active again with purchases totaling 4.193 bales) while in New Zealand the top three buyers purchased almost 50 % of the offering.

"Good and best" style top-making fleece wool with low VM. good colour and higher staple strength continued to attract the attention of most buyers, while "average and inferior" style lots were generally discounted in the weeks markets. Those fleece wool lots with pronounced tender wool with "mid-staple" breaks were most affected.

Better style, low VM skirtings generally closed the week unchanged, while less stylish lots struggled to hold their price.

In South Africa 9855 bales of wool were sold during the week, in New Zealand over 16,000 bales and in Australia 88% of the 68.011 bales available to the trade changed hands (59.926 bales). Included in the offering were 5,113 bales of crossbred wool of which 93.2% was sold.

Auctions continue in next week in New Zealand and Australia.

### Chile apologises for Lan Peru video

CHILEAN Foreign Minister Ignacio Walker said on Tuesday that a tourism video shown onboard flights of the Peruvian affiliate of Chilean airline Lan highlighting crime dangers and public-health problems in Lima had been "fool-

In a radio interview in Santiago Mr Walker said Lan Peru was well aware that showing the video onboard its flights had been a terrible mistake and that the company had apologised in a statement published in Peruvian newspapers.

"They are quite aware that this was to say the least, foolish. However. I would like to point out that the video was ordered from the DMX Inflight Company from Los Angeles, which also was distributed among other airlines," indi-cated Mr Walker. "Actually it was being aired by all airlines flying to Peru.

However Mr Walker underlined he saw no reason for the air carrier to pay compensation to those who felt offended by the video and insisted that the video incident should not in any way "affect Chilean-Peruvian free-trade talks".

"The press information was specifically denied, we're on a very

good footing with the trade negotiations," said Mr Walker.

On Monday, Lan Peru management met with Peruvian legislators and Cabinet ministers to discuss the video, but the company refused to comment on the outcome of the meeting. Lan Peru described the incident as an "involuntary mis-

Apparently Lan Peru has promised to finance a new video highlighting the country's attractions such as its folklore, rich archaeological past, Indian culture and the later European influence when Lima was capital of the Spanish South Pacific viceroy.

The original video shows a man urinating in a Lima street, mountains of garbage, and children begging and hanging from public transport buses, "denigrating" Peru's international image.

However Peruvian Foreign Trade and Tourism Minister Alfredo Ferrero and several Congress members are demanding legal action be taken against Lan Chile's subsidiary.

Lan Peru employs 1,800 workers and operates eleven domestic and eleven international routes a

### Argentine beef exports fall as livestock prices rise

THE rise in livestock prices during the last year resulted in a drop in beef exports, which in the first quarter of 2005 posted a 5 percent decrease from 2004, according to the ABC Beef Exporters Chamber.

Meanwhile, the group of the country's exporting meatpackers said that a drop in prices in recent days in the Liniers market facilitates the compliance with the agreement signed with the Agriculture Secretariat to lower domestic market prices, and urged for these falling prices to be transferred to

"In the first quarter of 2005, beef sales abroad fell by 5 percent. from 267 million dollars in October-December 2004 to 254 million dollars in the January-March period 2005," ABC sources said.

The entity said that the downturn in exports is due to the rise in livestock prices, which reached "10 percent in the last 12 months.

ABC said that although the National Foods Service (Senasa) announced that beef exports had risen 40 percent last quarter, it did so by comparing this period with the first quarter of 2004, when most international markets were closed to Argentine beef due to foot-andmouth disease.

ABC sources added that the

growth highlighted by the official sanitary agency "continued until last November, but then stagnated and today shows signs of significant contraction.

The ABC consortium stressed that "the phenomenon is explained by the strong price increase in livestock, which rose from 0.63 cents of a dollar per kilo in the first quarter of 2004, to 0.70 cents in the first quarter of 2005, which represents a 10 percent increase in the cost of exporting meatpackers' raw materials

Another related factor in the falling level of beef exports is the "strong competition from Brazil" currently "the main beef exporter in the world" which makes it difficult for local meatpackers to justify livestock prices and, according to ABC, explains why "a business that began with great expectations in 2004, is now beginning to seriously worry exporters.

ABC sources added that "the lower prices registered in recent days" in livestock prices in the Liniers market, coupled with the sector's difficulties, contributed to 'positively" reducing the price of beef, which they hope will reach points of sale, and be transferred quickly to the consumer.

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



# Mastin's Point choice for Murrel road route

THE route for the new road to Murrel Farm, with a crossing at Mastin's Point, has finally been decided upon by Executive Council.

Described by the Acting Governor, Miss Harriet Hall, as "probably one of the most emotive and controversial issues which has arisen over the last few months." the route through Mastin's Point was initially chosen on engineering grounds. However, when it was announced there were a number of objections on the grounds that this route would have a significant negative impact on the area which is a local beauty spot and popular with fishermen, alternative routes were explored.

Announcing Executive Council's decision this week. Miss Hall said expert advice has been sought from Fisheries Department on the fishing aspects and from the Environmental Planning Department on other issues.

After considering all the options, she said, councillors decided that the route originally planned across Mastin's Point should stand. "...but that work should not begin until a satisfactory management plan for the site had been drawn up in outline."

She explained, "The plan's aims will be to detail how best to protect the natural environment, in particular the fish stocks, and it should address not only the effect of building the road but also any potential effects of increased access."

The plan is to be submitted to Executive Council in September.

### Custody could follow attack

TWO men are likely to face custodial sentences after an alleged vicious assault on a third man.

The two, Ryan Hawksworth of Stanley and military firefighter Christopher Saunders, face a number of charges after a night of violence which included an attack on Gene Berntsen, leading to his hospitalisation in early April.

The Magistrate's Court heard on Wednesday that, since the attack, Mr Berntsen has suffered frequent headaches, dizziness, nose bleeds, and pain behind the car as a result of the assault and he experiences fear when going out.

A third co-accused, Andrew MacDonald of Stanley, faces connected charges but is not likely to face a custodial sentence.

# Fines follow ship's spill



THE owners and master of the reefer vessel which ran aground near Cochon Island, causing a fuel spill which badly affected wildlife in the area, have been fined in the

Magistrates Court.

The master of Novia Scotia (above), Mr Peter Mosselburger, pleaded guilty on Wednesday to an offence contrary to Section 5(1) of the Oil in Territorial Waters Ordinance 1960. The vessel's owners. Thien and Heyenga GmbH from Hamburg. Germany also entered a plea of guilty, through their legal representative. Mr Richard Marlor.

The two parties were charged with failing to report a spill to the Harbour Master on April 20, after damage was caused to the vessel.

The court heard that the ship's log recorded an oil spillage from number four tank on the port side at 7.30am on April 20. The ship had collided with Cochon Island at approximately 1.45am, and then steamed a short distance before assessing the damage.

The ship's agents, Falkland Islands Company Ltd (FIC), reported the ship's grounding to the Harbour Master at 8.15am and divers were requested to asses the damage to the propeller and rudder; there was no report from the vessel about oil spillage.

At 12.40pm, FIC agent Alan Henry was informed of the existence of an oil spill and he visited the vessel on a launch. He discovered a slick which he estimated to stretch 3.5 nautical miles and 20 metres wide

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek said that from that point the Harbour Master was satisfied that all the necessary steps to reduce the spillage were taken. She said as the damage was to the hull of the ship it was not appropriate to bring the vessel in to Stanley.

When asked why he had not reported the spillage forthwith, the ship's master. Mr Mosselburger, said he had been concerned to make the discovery himself, but it did not seem visually very serious and therefore he did not consider it was an urgent matter to inform owners.

He said there was no deliberate intent to conceal the spill: he had been aware the agency's launch was on the way to inspect the vessel and that it may have been the strain and pressure he was under that prevented him from reporting the incident immediately.

Defence lawyer Richard Marlor said the facts of the case were not in dispute, however he added that the cause of the damage was an "uncharted rock" just off Cochon Island.

Mr Marlor said there was "nothing sinister" behind his client's actions and Mr Mosselburger had not intended to conceal anything

In sentencing, Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said it is the master's specific duty to report any spillage "forthwith" and forthwith means, "...just that, not even in reasonable time."

She said the master must have been aware of the environmentally sensitive waters around the Falkland Islands and, while she understood he had been under strain, nevertheless he had a responsibility as master of the ship to report the incident.

The maximum penalty for such an offence is £10,000.

Mrs Faulds said that in the circumstances she would impose a penalty of £1,500 each on the master and the owner; each party will also pay £250 as a contribution to costs incurred by the government and a further £70 each for prosecution costs.

### Court correction: You *not* guilty

PENGUIN NEWS wishes to correct an article published in last week's edition entitled 'Custodial sentence considered for Yon' in which we wrongly stated that Mr Barry Yon had been found guilty of threats to kill his ex-partner, Miss Genieve Youde, and of an assault against her.

Mr Yon was, in fact, found not guilty by the Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds, after his trial on both these two charges; Mr Yon previously pleaded guilty to a separate charge of being in possession of a bladed article in a public place, for which he will be sentenced by the court in due course.

At the end of Mr Yon's trial on Friday, April 22, 2005, the Senior Magistrate stated in court that she had carefully considered and reviewed the evidence in relation to the burden and standard of proof required for both charges.

In relation to the first alleged offence, that of making to another person a threat, intending that that other person would fear it would be carried out, to kill that other or a third person, Mrs Faulds said that there was some doubt as to the actual words used. In this case, there was perhaps some sort of threat made, but it did not amount to enough to convict Mr Yon. The burden and standard of proof required for this offence had not been discharged and Mr Yon would be acquitted.

In relation to the charge of assault, Mrs Faulds stated that there was unquestionably some doubt concerning who assaulted whom first and Mr Yon was entitled to an acquittal.

HMS SHEFFIELD, the British warship sunk by an Argentine Exocet missile during the Falklands War, has been honoured by a former crew member visiting the Islands this week.

Mark 'Ginge' Hiscutt visited Sea Lion Island on Wednesday to pay a personal tribute to his ship mates who died aboard the vessel on May 4, 1982.

AS WE hit the shops this morning, the results of the General Election should have filtered through.

I won't dare to welcome Tony back, for fear of committing the same howler as Fox News during the Gore/Bush elections; suffice to say, I'll be surprised if Mr Howard is the new PM today.

Closer to home. I was delighted to receive a call from Dr Andrea Clausen this week - spurred on by last week's editorial - confirming she will be

throwing her hat into the election ring later this year.

Not only was it pleasing to hear from someone so transparent about their intentions well in advance of the election but I like the fact that she's a thirty-something. I intend no disrespect to those elder members of the community but as someone who is more than a score short of fifty. I do feel the younger generation needs better representation on council.

We certainly need a louder voice for our students.

The news this week from Executive Council that no longer will specific priority for the allocation of government housing be afforded them on their return home will inevitably be another knock, a further test to their resolve to come home at the end of their studies.

Most Falklands students are kicking their heels to forge their careers at home but if we keep reducing the appeal of doing that, they are likely to stay

They're not asking for three bedroom mansions: a cabin in Murray Heights is clearly more than enough. I know there's room in the YMCA and other such establishments but surely the last place most people who have spent the last five years or so in halls want to live is in shared accommodation?

(Perhaps the answer could lie in a starter home scheme - the provision of a small home, ie a cabin or small flat, under a short term lease. This would

provide the ideal push to enter the housing market.)

One can only imagine how galling it must be for a student to learn they have lost their priority for housing when we regularly hear of 'in need' people returning to the Falklands after a long absence, jumping the queue and being housed immediately.

The situation is so favoured towards welfare cases, I wouldn't be in the least bit surprised if our female students start returning home with-child - no doubt they would then be guaranteed a place of their own.

I realise we now have more students overseas than ever before and this is from where the problem stems, but the system is again disappointing them.

If the Falkland Islands Government expects a return on its stake in education, it seems wrong to put another hurdle in the path of those who are making a concerted effort to build on that investment.

### EU Constitution argument runs on

FORMER Argentine president Carlos Menem has criticised the policy of the current government towards the Falkland Islands saying, "Galtieri lost the war and Kirchner is losing peace."

Mr Menem was commenting on Argentina's complaint to the European Union over the inclusion of the Falklands as a British Overseas Territory in the EU Constitution, reported last week in Penguin News.

He said Argentines should be con-cerned by, "...the growing and vertiginous international isolation which this government is leading us with its verbally confrontational and factually debilitating manners.

The foreign policy of President Kirchner is isolating and debilitating the country and seriously harming

its interests.

A senior British MEP wrote to the EU's 'foreign minister'. Javier Solana, after Argentina's protest was lodged.

Mr Edward McMillan-Scott MEP. Vice-President of the European Parliament, said. "Argentina is a bit slow on the uptake as the EU govern-ments agreed this Treaty on June 18

last year.
"Normally Argentina makes difficulties over the Falkland Islands when the government is in trouble at home. The fact is that Argentina did not exist at the time that Britain

discovered and held the Falkland Islands."

In a letter to Mr Solana, Mr McMillan-Scott pointed out that the EU's commitment to democracy worldwide. "should embrace the rights of the Falkland Islanders to decide their own form of government."

Whenever this has been tested. the Islanders have been unequivocally in favour of remaining Brit-

Penguin News received a number of angry and sometimes abusive messages from Argentina after publishing the article about the protest to the EU in last week's edition.

One writer, Gaby Rjona, reflected the mood of his fellow correspondents: "The Falkland Islands (as you like to call them) or Islas Malvinas (their real name) are ours; they belong to Argentina.

You stole it from us a long time ago so you, all the British people and the government are thieves.

Now you want to include it in the European Constitution. How dare you do that? We kicked you once, twenty years ago and we will do that again but the next time will be definite - not by a war, but the diplomatic way.

"So start preparing because you don't have much time left in OUR

### Meeting to dissect oil spill procedures

A MEETING is to be held to discuss the "lessons learned" following the oil spill near Berkeley Sound last week.

Marine Officer Jon Clark says the National Oil Spill Contingency Plan implemented after the grounding of the reefer vessel Nova Scotia on April 19, "...worked in so far as interested parties were kept informed as to developments during the spill."

The vessel grounded on Cochon Island and fuel was leaked, affecting wildlife in the area.

Mr Clark said a period of 60 hours elapsed between the initial grounding of the Nova Scotta and the sealing of the leaking tank by divers, due to weather conditions.

He said the slick trajectory was monitored by launch and FIGAS aircraft, "...to facilitate monitoring and evaluation.

The slick generally dispersed eastwards out of Berkeley Sound. therefore a decision was made to allow natural dispersion.

Mr Clark said strategies "such as the use of dispersant" were considered "but discarded for several reasons."

He explained, "Intermediate fuel oil is only amenable to spraying with certain dispersants in the first few hours after spillage before emulsification or weathering takes place. Other considerations were the proximity of kelp beds and the borderline depth of water. (Dispersant is not normally used in less than 30 metres water depth.)"

Dispersant breaks oil into droplets which then remain within the water column until broken down naturally by bacteria.

Mr Clark said a meeting is to be held in the near future between interested parties such as the Environmental Planning Department. Falklands Conservation and the Fisheries Department, "...to consider whether anything might have been done differently and any lessons learned for the future.

### Sheep shipping rate set at £2 for all

ALL SHEEP movements on the coastal shipping service are to be charged at £2 per animal.

For some time, in practise there has been a £2 per head charge for moving sheep to the abattoir on the coastal shipping service. The official Executive Council-approved rate for sheep was £3 for more than 30 sheep and £5 for less than 30 sheep moved; however a charge of only £2 has been made for moving sheep bound for the abattoir.

In a paper to Standing Finance Committee, the Head of Policy, Dr Mike Harte said there did not ap-

pear to be a record of Executive Council approving a differential rate for abattoir-bound sheep and. .farmers have sometimes complained that the current provider is charging £3 for moving non-abattoir sheep because they have become accustomed to the £2 abattoir rate."

He recommended, "given the low number of non-abattoir sheep movements," charging a single rate of £2 for all sheep movements. This was approved by Standing Finance Committee at its meeting on Friday, April 29.

### **Court news**

### Man hospitalised in 'night of violence'

THREE men have appeared in court following a series of events which resulted in a fourth man being hospitalised.

Stanley man Ryan Hawksworth pleaded guilty to charges of assault, violent disorder and affray, Christopher Saunders from Mount Pleasant pleaded guilty to violent disorder and malicious wounding and Andrew James MacDonald of Stanley pleaded guilty to violent disorder and affray, following a series of incidents which occurred on the night of April 1 and the early hours of April 2.

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek told the court that the 'night of violence' began for Mr Hawksworth in Deano's Bar when he hit Mr Roy McKay because "he didn't like him.

Also during the evening, Mr Saunders was heard to make unprovoked threats to Mr Gene Berntsen in the Globe Tavern. Although there was a scuffle outside the Globe at closing time Ms Cheek said she was unable to give an account of what actually happened due to lack of witness accounts; Mr Saunders claimed to have been kicked and Mr Hawksworth and Mr MacDonald claim to have been attacked.

Accounts were plentiful for what occurred next, with 20 witnesses in the vicinity of Michele's Cafe.

Mr Berntsen was seen running from the Globe, followed by Mr Saunders who caught him and threw him to the ground. Mr Berntsen was said to have shown no aggression.

One witness said Mr Saunders steadied himself by the door frame of the cafe and "deliberately and repeatedly" kicked Mr Berntsen in the face, "each time with a large backswing with his leg." Another said "...he kicked him until he bled."

Mr MacDonald and Mr Hawksworth arrived on the scene and Mr MacDonald tried to pull Mr Saunders from Mr Berntsen.

Mr Hawksworth was seen wrestling with three men, thought to be friends of Mr Saunders

Mr Leon Mitchell was called from the cafe and pulled Mr Saunders and Mr MacDonald away from Mr Berntsen and Mr Saunders entered the cafe, telling the young assistant that she "would get some of the same" if she did not let him in.

Several female witnesses approached to help Mr Berntsen who appeared to be unconscious and one told of how as she cradled Mr Berntsen's head Mr Hawksworth kicked him in the head.

Ms Cheek said police arrived at the scene at 12.19am. Mr Saunders admitted what he had done and there was no further trouble from him.

Mr Hawksworth and Mr MacDonald then turned on the police, causing two of them to draw their batons; Mr Hawksworth was struck above the left knee. An ambulance arrived and the officers went back to dealing with the casualty.

Mr Hawksworth and Mr

MacDonald continued to shout abuse at the officers and Mr MacDonald shouted at Detective Sergeant Jon Butler. "you are going to die: you are going to burn in your f\*\*king house." In a statement, DS Butler described the pair as "playing to the crowd

Mr Hawksworth spat in the face of the cafe proprietor three times when she asked him to get off her land. After some negotiation the two men were arrested.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said that Mr MacDonald was "mercifully less involved" than the other two, however she asked that pre-sentence reports be prepared on all three

She said she accepts, on the face of it. Mr MacDonald's actions were not so serious as the other two and that Mr Hawksworth and Mr Saunders are likely to face custodial sentences.

The three men have been released on conditional bail to reappear in court on June 15.

Lookout Lodge brawl

Ryan Hawksworth, John McKay. Melvyn Clifton and Mervyn Lee all entered guilty pleas to an assortment of charges which stemmed from a fight at Lookout Lodge on March

On Thursday, Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds fined Mr McKay £150 for each of his two offences - assault and affray - and Mr Clifton £75 for disorderly behaviour. She also ordered both men to pay prosecution costs of £70 and bound them over to keep the peace for one year.

Mr Lee and Mr Hawksworth. who face respective charges of assault and affray, are to reappear in court on June 15 for sentencing, following the preparation of pre-sen-

tence reports.

### Excitement grows for FOGL as 2D results analysed

FALKLAND Oil and Gas Ltd says leads identified by a 2D seismic survey have, "...far exceeded our most optimistic estimates.

The company announced this week that it had completed its current 9,450km 2D survey over most of its licence area in the South and East Falkland Basin. It says the programme has indicated, "...a larger and more diverse project than originally anticipated and has identified numerous possible drill targets, with indications that some could potentially be of significant size."

The company hopes to drill its first well in 2007.

John Armstrong, Executive Chairman of FOGL, says the Falklands, "...could become a new petroleum province by the end of the decade" and described the seismic reports as "remarkable"

FOGL says the data identified approximately 130 leads, "a number of which appear capable of containing recoverable reserves in excess of 200 million barrels."

At the end of March, FOGL had £10.9 million cash. It now says it is evaluating its funding requirements, "...and the source of funds for the increased exploration programme."

### Poacher Elqui: not to be used for fishing again

THE vessel Elqui has been handed over to the Government of South Georgia and it is planned that she will never be used to fish again.

The owners and master of the ship were convicted of illegal fishing in South Georgia waters on April 19.

The ship's owners, Geneagles Corporation, automatically forfeited the vessel when they failed to pay fines and prosecution costs totalling over £300,000 within seven days.

The South Georgia Director of Fisheries, Miss Harriet Hall said, the government soon hopes to take a decision on what to do with the Elqui, however it is their intention that, "...she should never fish again."

Miss Hall told the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station, take a very firm stance on illegal fishing and we want to put her out of action. But exactly how we can do that is something we need to discuss with lawyers and experts...

In court on Friday, April 29, the Senior Magistrate approved an application from the Crown that the vessel be handed over to the South Georgia Government.

# News from Executive Council's April 28 meeting

### Cllrs: reward illex companies' loyalty

COUNCILLORS have expressed their concern at the continued failure of the illex fishery.

The Director of Fisheries and all Councillors (except one) were present to discuss the early closure of the illex season and the issue of whether refunds should be made to licensed jiggers.

Acting Governor Harriet Hall said, "...councillors were naturally very concerned about the failure of the stock again and discussed the future prospects for the fishery. They considered the need to reward past loyalty and to ensure future interest in the fishery but also the current financial situation of the Islands and the need to make savings."

Miss Hall added, "The Director of Fisheries was able to provide some useful clarification of a number of points which Councillors raised and it was very valuable to have him attend in person."

### New Bill increases protection of 'vulnerable'

THE Sexual Offences Bill, which enacts the provisions of the UK's Sexual Offences Act, has been approved for submission to Legislative Council.

Harriet Hall commented, "This is significant because it increases the amount of protection for vulnerable people in society – in particular for children."

Also approved by the meeting was an amendment for the Media Trust Bill to take account of the

fact that the Media Trust is to take over the running of the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station. (See article on page 12.)

Miss Hall said, "This is a move that has been discussed for some time and has been discussed with all the staff who are aware of the implications."

Other pieces of legislation to look out for in the Gazette are the Planning (Amendment) Bill and the Finance Bill.

### Oil: future work plans will be published

WORK plans made by oil exploration companies as part of their licensing agreement will be made public in future.

This will enable other companies who are interested in applying for a licence to see the kind of work which FIG expects them to commit to – although obviously each company will have a different work plan.

Also agreed by Executive Council was that, in the event that the

private sector is unable to provide the required services, the government will. "consider assisting in facilitating the logistics requirements of the forthcoming drilling programme."

In addition, an increase of container storage charges in the FIPASS secure area is to be made, from £160 to £240 per annum (or £30 per square metre for other goods), effective from July 1.

### Ramshackle Government Jetty: what is its future?

COUNCILLORS want to hear views from members of the public on the future of the Government Jetty which is currently in a ramshackle state.

Miss Hall said a range of options was put to councillors but they asked for further consultation with people who use the Jetty. She added that councillors did however decide the fate of the Camber House which is to be put up for sale by public tender. A notice inviting bids has already been issued and further information is available from the Secretariat.

### Truants' parents to face prosecution

THE education legislation is to be amended, giving the Attorney General powers to prosecute parents who allow their children to miss school regularly.

This was one of a number of eduction-related issues considered by Executive Council.

Councillors discussed a paper on ways to deal with persistent unauthorised absences from school and agreed to make amendments to the legislation to enable stronger measures to be taken in the case of persistent offenders. Acting Governor Miss Harriet Hall reported. "ExCo takes a very strong view of unauthorised absences, although councillors were keen to stress that they recognised there were occasions when it was not appropriate to take strong action.

"For example, many families took holidays rarely and when they did go away it was for a considerable period of time. Provided that this was not a regular occurrence and that a child did not miss a vital part of his or her schooling, councillors would not be in favour of action being taken."

However. Miss Hall said, persistent absences, in particular during important years such as preparing for GCSE, will be discouraged and councillors agreed to amend the existing legislation to give the Attorney General powers to prosecute parents who allowed their children to miss school regularly.

Also discussed by councillors was the issue of who should be entitled to funding from the government for further and higher education. Miss Hall explained, "At the moment this is available to all Status holders, regardless of how long they had been in the Islands, or whether or not they were likely to return."

The issue will be discussed further by a small group of officials who are to prepare a further paper for councillors.

Miss Hall added. "Councillors were very conscious of the need to be fair and not to discriminate against some people, but also of the importance of ensuring that the Islands have the possibility of benefiting from what can be a significant expense."

Miss Hall also reported that Executive Councillors confirmed that applications for Government Housing from returning students should be considered on their merits and not given automatic priority. "This will be made clear in the Government's Housing Allocation Policy Statement."

### Collectable coins commemorate wedding and war

COIN collectors and souvenir hunters, stay on the lookout for new commemorative coins to be produced soon.

Miss Hall described the new coins: "One is a gold coin to mark the wedding of the Prince of Wales to Mrs Parker-Bowles and shows a bouquet of flowers, including four sprays of Pale Maiden.

"Another is a coin to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the end of the Second World War showing a family waving flags and surrounded by bunting and then a set of four coins to commemorate the anniversary of the death of Sir



Winston Churchill which show him in four different aspects – as a young soldier, an artist, a writer and in his most famous role broadcasting to the nation during World War II."



IF the situation is correct, can you explain how FIGAS has arrived at a point where there is one Islander currently suitable for service and one with a limited amount of hours available for medical emergencies while two are undergoing major overhauls?

Also where the funding is coming from for two extra employees during a period of cutbacks within Government?

A FIGAS General Manager, Fraser Wallace, kindly provided the following reply.

Safety of our aircraft, and therefore the service, passengers and staff, is of course a paramount requirement for FIGAS. Following on from regular 50, 100 and 500-hour checks, FIGAS aircraft are also required - every other year - to undergo a check on reaching 1000 hours expended airframe time. These periods of deep maintenance fall consecutively, with aircraft being brought off line some weeks apart to provide for a rolling programme of operational aircraft and those undergoing deep maintenance.

Total aircraft hours flown over recent years have remained similar: the hours flown on fishery patrol have reduced considerably, whilst utilisation of passenger aircraft has increased However, because of ageing airframes, the requirement for longer maintenance periods has become evident. A recent 1000hour check took twice as long to complete as would usually be expected and this obviously means that there has been a significant increase in the time that aircraft are unavailable for service.

This has resulted in the current situation of a backlog of deep maintenance requirements. Although reducing use of airframes during the busy season could have allowisted the situation.

alleviated the situation, it was reasoned that this approach was not in the best interests of the users of the service or the economy.

There has been very careful monitoring of aircraft usage over the weeks following the close of the summer season. Over the past few days FIGAS has had one aircraft (Bravo India) available for normal operations, with limited hours available on Bravo Mike for emergency requirements. Additional hours are being worked by engineers to ensure that Bravo Delta will be back in service, alongside Bravo India, early next week (ie Monday, May 9).

We are looking at employing two or three experienced Islander fitters for a period of about two months in order to complete deep maintenance on Bravo Mike and Bravo Romeo. Approval was given for us to employ another full time License Aircraft Engineer (who has since been appointed). This was not an easy decision for anyone, given the present economic climate and Govemment cutbacks but was a decision of enormous benefit to the service. It is worth mentioning that. because of careful and efficient management of pilot rosters, when the current Maintenance Manager, previously a pilot, took a career change, the vacancy subsequently made available upon his transfer had not been filled. In terms of overall staffing levels, there has been no increase

### New system for plant operators

FALKLANDS Plant Operators have expressed concern over the continuity of their certification scheme. however the Training Centre say that systems are in place for operators to continue within the Islands, and possibly overseas, under a new scheme being set up.

Training and Development manager Eileen Davies explained that the Training Centre is hoping to have standards published by the beginning of the new financial year. Plant Operators, who currently have CITB tickets, can still apply to renew them providing they are able to cover the minimum hours laid down by CITB; for some this will be feasible, for others, in view of the amount of different plant they are operating, it will not.

Mrs Davies said this in no way represents a drop in standards of operation within the Islands.

TRACMIN, the Australian training company who sent two of their trainers down to the Falkland Islands in January this year, left the Falkland Islands Training Unit with a set of standards against which plant operators can be assessed to prove their competence on different items of plant.

All new government plant operators will in future receive training on each piece of plant they operate and will be assessed by a qualified assessor. Their logbooks will be signed by validators approved by CITB. At present these are Bob Hancox and Larry Neale. The operators will then be presented with a locally accredited certificate or card as proof of their competence.

All current FIG plant operators are encouraged to undertake the CITB's on-line health and safety test and for all new operators this is a requirement.

Some local private sector companies who employ plant operators may also decide to apply these local standards and some have already sent plant operators on the assessor training.

Although this system will not result in operators holding accredited CITB cards, it is hoped that any operators who leave the Islands to work elsewhere will be able to prove their competence by producing logbooks and certification which show they have followed a programme of training and assessment measured against standards comparable to other countries.

Mrs Davies said, "Those working for MOD at Mount Pleasant will still, I believe, be required to renew their CITB cards."

### SSL: Islanders' maximum shareholding 5%

THE government's Chief Executive has revealed more about the sale of shares in Stanley Servies Ltd. including a 5% maximum shareholding envisaged for Islanders.

As reported recently in *Penguin News*, a new shareholder, the Lavinia Corporation, has joined the Board of Stanley Services Limited.

Chris Simpkins explained why the government had opted to sell some its shares in SSL. He said "Prior to completion of this restructure. FIG was the majority shareholder in Stanley Services because it acquired the shares of a former shareholder. Hogg Robinson (HR), when that company went out of business in 2001.

"FIG felt that this was an unhealthy position to be in and has had a long held ambition to remove itself completely as a shareholder in Stanley Services. Equally, as part of the agreement to acquire the HR shares, the other shareholder. S and JD Robertson, insisted that they did not wish to be a minority shareholder in a two party business with FIG and that the HR shares should in due course be sold on to a third narty."

This deal reduces FIG's shares back to the level of its original shareholding and, Mr Simpkins said, provides the vehicle by which its remaining shares will be offered for sale to Falkland Islanders.

Falkland Islanders will not be able to buy unlimited amounts of FIG's shares when they're offered for sale, Mr Simpkins said. "Shares will be made available to Falklands residents or companies under the control of residents and based in the Islands. Whilst subject to further detailed discussion, the maximum shareholding currently envisaged is 5%."

In December 2001 Executive Council (ExCo) considered a paper on the future direction of SSL and agreed a proposal from the company that the introduction of a new shareholder would be good for the development of the business and the economy of the Islands and which would reduce the government's shareholding.

Lavinia have been the exclusive bunkering contractor for Stanley Services for almost two years, and. Mr Simpkins says, the opportunity to bring bunkering into the activities of SSL, "to provide better control and increase business opportunities," made Lavinia the obvious choice. "It also provides the opportunity for additional tax revenue since the new joint venture company. Stanley Bunkering Limited, will be based in the Falkland Islands and pay tax here."

Mr Simpkins justified the decision not to give Falkland Islanders the opportunity to buy shares. He said, "The sale of FIG shares to local people or companies has always been one of the objectives of the transaction and that will happen. However, initially, the objective was to bring in a new major shareholder with business interests and skills that would help SSL to grow and enable greater control to be exercised over offshore bunkering activities.

"S and JD Robertson would not have agreed the sale of this tranche of shares to Falkland Islanders, but

as part of the overall agreement has agreed that the balance of FlG shares can be sold to Falkland Islanders free of his right to pre-emption."

Approval to begin negotiations was given by Executive Council in January 2002 and the process has taken longer than the government hoped. Mr Simpkins commented. This is a very complicated transaction which re-structures the company. At times, the negotiations have been very difficult indeed and nearly broke down altogether towards the end of last year.

"I don't think anyone thought the process would take so long to complete."

There have been numerous reports to ExCo on the progress of negotiations and. Mr Simpkins said, authority to continue negotiations and approve the outcome, has been given at each stage. "Final approval was given by ExCo on November 24, 2004 when, with the exception of Councillor Roger Edwards, all councillors were present. The legal formalities were completed on March 30, 2005."

From the sale of shares. FIG received £1.26m from the Lavinia Corporation. "This is in addition to a net surplus of £569.348 made by FIG in 2001 from an extraordinary dividend from SSL and ACT, less the cost of share purchase." Mr Simpkins said. He confimed that the money has been placed in FIG's financial reserves.

The government's legal costs total £350,600, excluding the cost of time spent on the transaction by officials; Mr Simpkins said the figure is "somewhat larger than expected" due to the "very protracted nature of the negotiations."

So who now owns the company? "FIG owns 44.9%. S & JD Robertson own 30% and Lavinia own 25.1%."

The Chief Executive also confirmed that Stanley Services has been granted a new exclusive ten year licence for the supply of fuels including offshore bunkering.

When asked what protection consumers have against excessive increases in fuel prices, he said. "The Fuel Supply Agreement contains a detailed formula which controls the retail price of fuel to civilian, ic non-military, consumers and enables FIG to audit how prices are fixed to ensure that the operating costs of the company are reasonable and excessive profits are not made.

"This now applies equally to onshore domestic fuel and offshore bunkering."

He also confirmed that Stanley Services is allowed to compete with other companies active in the Islands in other areas of the economy: "The original Memorandum and Articles of the company when it was set up in 1987 did not restrict its range of activities, and it has not subsequently been possible to formally amend that.

"However FIG's directors have negotiated agreements to restrict company activities to its core businesses and will insist that it competes on fair terms. The company is, of course, registered in the Falkland Islands and will therefore pay corporation tax in respect of its activities."

# Wind farm prospects grow with submission of planning application

STANLEY may soon have it's own wind farm.

The Power and Electrical Section of the Public Works Department have applied for planning permission for a 900 kWe wind farm at Sand Bay. This comprises an array of three 300 kWe turbines each having a hub height of 50 metres (162.5 feet) and a rotor diameter of 30 metres (97 feet).

The units currently being considered are manufactured by a German company called Enercon whose E33 is a wind turbine that has been developed and designed for remote locations.

Glenn Ross. Power Station Manager says the turbine is synchronous with variable pitch control blades. "This is a key design feature, as for the first time a wind turbine promises the close output limit control necessary for successful integration on to our relatively small electricity supply network."


Mr Ross explained that wind turbine power output varies in direct proportion to the cube of the instantaneous wind speed. "For example, a wind speed of five metres per second doubling to 10 metres per second, would not double the power output but would increase it by nearly 10 times. This is both good and bad, good in that we have a vast wind resource, bad in that it is a rapidly varying wind, resulting in a rapidly varying power output.

"This means that conventional diesel fuelled generation needs to provide instantaneous compensation for the fluctuations in the wind

turbine output."

Large networks such as the UK and Europe, with their vast array of nuclear, coal, gas and oil power stations can at present absorb these fluctuating outputs from standard asynchronous wind turbines.

Our small system. Mr Ross says, could not readily do so. "In camp, small wind turbines provide

a varying charging current for banks of batteries, the batteries in part perform as a buffer, and homes are then supplied via an inverter."

Mr Ross says the Power and Electrical Section of PWD is supportive of the environmental benefits that the wind farm will bring and says there is a general need to feel better about how we use energy - "there are obvious branding and marketing opportunities derived from having a wind farm."

However, he adds, the primary goals here are to deliver a successful engineering project that displaces imported fossil fuels economically.

And what about the price of electricity? Mr Ross says. "It is unlikely that the wind farm will result in a reduction in electricity prices in the short term. firstly any capital funding allocation will need to be returned and then the wind farm can be used to stabilise future electricity prices."

The importance of the Sand

Bay site itself cannot be overstated, according to Mr Ross, "Wind turbines are large dynamic machines: in the right location their appearance is attractive and even majestic, in the wrong location the opposite is true. The remoteness of the site also deals nicely with noise and television interference issues."

Enercon describes the site, from photographs, as "excellent".

The Falkland Islands Development Corporation's Energy Advisory Officer. Tim Cotter, is similarly enthusiastic and has been working closely with the Power and Electrical Section and has been gathering wind data for this site since 2002. This wind data was used by McLellan and Partners in a recent PWD consultancy to assess the site's suitability for a wind farm.

Mr Ross says concerns such as bird mortality have been raised and will have to be considered as part of the planning process, but he says the units envisaged have a low rotor speed which reduces this risk and the site will be the subject of a baseline survey as part of the appraisal.

A working group has been established with the aim of delivering the best renewable energy solution for Stanley. Chaired by Councillor Roger Edwards, members are Environmental Planning Officer Dominique Giudicelli, Tim Cotter. Mr Ross and his colleague, electrical engineer John Burns.

The Power and Electrical Section anticipates that they will shortly be in a position to submit a detailed paper to Executive Council seeking capital approval for the project to be undertaken in the 2006/2007 financial year.

This section of PWD has been involved in over 25 years of research into a wind farm for Stanley and is pleased to describe what are now a series of "green lights" for the project. Mr Ross says, "Key changes are the development of a wind turbine, very much with situations like ours in mind and the endorsement by McLellan and Partners Ltd and wind power experts Garrad Hassan for the single supply authority strategy. This allows the most harmonious and efficient circumstances for conventional and wind power integration, optimising fuel displacement

He adds however that the technical demands of the project will be considerable. "The control systems at the Power Station need to be fully modernised and staff trained in the maintenance and operation of them. The maintenance of the wind turbines will be undertaken by Power and Electrical staff with support and training from the manufacturers."

The next steps for the project was consideration of the project's planning submission at the Planning and Building Committee held yesterday.

There will be a project update for the Public Works Committee on May 12.

### Exclusive arrangements made for Campers' dental visits

FOLLOWING the recent announcement that camp dental visits have been replaced by subsidised visits to Stanley for dental treatment, the Director of Health Services. Norman McGregor Edwards has explained how the new system will work.

Instead of camp dental visits, camp residents should call the KEMH Reception (28000) to arrange a Camp Dental Appointment.

They will be entitled to one subsidised flight per year (costing £21 rather than £84) for a routine dental appointment, plus a subsidised flight for any appointments for emergency treatment.

Mr McGregor Edwards explained that each appointment will be for 1 to 1½ hours to enable a full dental examination and treatment. If any further appointments are required then they can be arranged at the time and will also be at the subsidised rate.

He added, "It must be stressed, though, that if people make and then fail to keep an appointment but still use the flight, they will be liable for the full cost of the flight.

"Furthermore, because camp residents will be given exceptionally long routine appointments, they cannot be arranged at short notice so please give at least three weeks notice."

The health service has also arranged for patients to be able to obtain other healthcare whilst they are visiting the hospital for dental treatment.

Mr McGregor Edwards said, "Once they know that they have a dental appointment, camp residents should also ask Reception to arrange any other appointments they may need, for the same day.

"These could be to see a doctor or midwife, or for health screening (Practice Nurse) or to see the Diabetes Nurse or Asthma Nurse."

# International degrees need not be wasted

Anya decided to gain a certificate of comparable study as, after spending five years of her life studying for a degree in such a difficult subject, she felt the experience should not go to waste and decided to have her degree recognised by the British system.

They asked her to provide genuine evidence of her original official documents provided by the Urals State Technical University and she sent these to the UK

They have now confirmed and officially certified that Anya holds a degree that is comparable to the British Bachelor Degree.

Anya urges other people who have carned a degree at a university in their home country to find out about comparability to Brit-

I can offer advice to anyone in this situation and put them in touch with UK NARIC, the official body who are under contract to the Department for Education and Skills (DtES). They are the official source of information and advice on the comparability of international qualifications from over 180 countries

### FIBS moves away from government in August

Falkland Broadcasting Station (FIBS) will cease to be a government department from mid-August.

Last year, the government announced that discussions were being held with the Media Trust with the aim of transferring the future operation of the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station to the Trust, thereby clearly separating the government from any involvement in the day to day operation and management of this important community news and information

The government this week announced that discussions and negotiations have been completed and, subject to the approval of Legislative Council, FIBS will join the Media Trust group with effect from August 15, 2005. Penguin News has been part of the Media Trust group for approximately 15 years.

The government will continue to own all the assets of the Station and will also provide annual financial support to the Trust.

Chris Simpkins. FIG Chief Executive, commented, "Whilst FIBS has operated perfectly satisfactorily without interference as a department of government there is an expectation that its independence should be more transparent.

"The Media Trust has proved itself more than capable of operating the Station and has some interesting plans to develop and improve the product.

"There still a number of staffing issues to be finalised but I'm confident that there will be a seamless transfer on August 15.

Dick Sawle, Chairman of the Media Trust said, "The Media Trust is delighted to have had the help and support of the FIG in the handover process and is looking forward to taking on the responsibility of the radio station.

"We have a number of new ideas to explore and promote with the radio station staff, and hope that all of our listeners will also help by giving the Media Trust feed-

"The aim is independence from government, but we must also entertain and inform and all ideas are welcome, and for that we need the support of our listeners."

### 'Harmless nuisance' numbers should lessen soon


ENTOMOPHOBICS in the Falklands can rest easy: the apparent earwig infestation in the Islands this year is expected to relent in the next few weeks, as winter approaches.

Dr Alex Jones, in charge of the Falklands Conservation invertebrates programme says the species is the European carwig. (Forficula auricularia), which are introduced but harmless. The bugs mostly eat "already dead organic matter, other insects and some-times living plants" and are considered a nuisance pest. The recentrise in their numbers is soon due to decrease again and Dr Jones says, "...will likely all disappear in a couple of weeks anyway

In addition to their obvious unattractiveness, the reputation of the earwig is made worse by the widespread fear that many people have regarding these insects.

Several tales exist concerning alleged damage caused by earwigs: how they like to crawl into ears or how the forceps cause a painful pinch. These stories have little basis in fact, although Dr Jones says carwigs have been known to cause a mildly painful bite when sat upon or handled.

Overall, he says, earwigs may



actually be considered beneficial - they feed on many plant pests, such as aphids, mites and insect eggs and have been used for biological control of some plant pests. "The main food of carwigs is vegetable matter which it usually seeks at night but also living and dead insects. Indoors it is a harmless nuisance.

For those who are not keen on having the creepy crawlies in their home. Dr Jones advises the removal of vegetation from around buildings, proofing entry points to prevent insects gaining access to the building, and emptying or cleaning out gutters to remove rotting leaves etc.

Sanitation and removal of hiding places are the best means toward control of earwig infestations inside. Look for earwigs around doorjams, door mats, basement window wells, beneath materials in basements or sheds, among

mulch near homes, and in kitchens and hathrooms

Additionally he advises: "Inside the house, use an indoor aerosol spray to eliminate an earwig population. This action is not effective by itself; it works only when hiding places are also removed. Occasional earwigs found in sinks or inside the home can be picked up with a tissue and-discarded outside.

"If an earwig infestation is a continual problem, close cracks and openings near utility entry areas in the house and foundation where they can gain entry.

'A residual spray on the outside foundation and in window wells may help provide control but not eliminate earwigs. For best results, clean and eliminate areas where they hide, eliminate favourable moisture conditions, and exclude their entry.

"If you have lots of earwigs leave rolled up newspaper on the floor overnight (most the animals will crawl into it) them simply remove it from the house.

Dr Jones says earwigs are not structural pests and do no harm with their feeding, "They are merely an annoyance. Removing the areas where they accumulate is the best control.

HO could have imagined that a 2590 metre runway could have been structured. have been "implemented in under 18 months from landing on virgin soil?"

Sir Rex Hunt's wonder at the achievement that was the opening of Mount Pleasant Airport twenty years ago is still shared by many today.

The decision to build a civil and military airport at March Ridge to international standards means that the children and young people of the Islands had a real future as, "...free citizens of their own country," according to the August 1984 edition of the Falkland Islands Newsletter

The article described life in Stanley in the aftermath of the invasion by Argentine Forces in 1982 and their subsequent ousting by British forces as, "not comfortable.

The people of Stanley are adapting to the continuous changes brought about by the military presence, the contractors teams working on roads, housing and reconstruction projects; and influx of officials, experts, parliamentarians and press. The town is overcrowded and full of strange faces

Defence Minister at the time. Michael Heseltine, announced in the House of Commons on June 27, 1983 that the decision had been taken to construct a new Falklands airport at Mount Pleasant instead of Stanley, because even allowing for the cost of a road between the new airport and Stanley it would be less expensive. He added that the Mount Pleasant site would also be less likely to suffer unforeseen delays and interruptions, also traffic at the existing Stanley Airport would not have to be restricted during

The contract was for works to the value of £190 million to which would be added the cost of the road from Mount Pleasant to Stanley and a separate MoD contract for communications and navigational aids, making a total of £215 million.

Details of the new British Government Defence budget released on July 6. 1983 announced an allowance of £624m for the defence of the Falklands and Territories. This was in addition to the price of the new airport and represented 4% of Britain's projected total defence budget.

Penguin News reported in March 1984 that work was progressing well and there was confidence that a basic airstrip would be operational by April

"Many Falkland Islanders have been pleasantly surprised at the consortium's progress. Memories of construction companies active in the Falklands over the last ten years or so have rather tainted respect for the construction business as a whole, but so far there have been no excuses or budget excesses at Mount Pleasant."

In November 1984, Penguin News in the form of reporter Rob McBride travelled to Mount Pleasant to see how work was progressing.

He wrote that the Entertainments Manager at the site was pleased to inform him that the 42nd sport had just been added to the list of activities available in the massive recreation complex: "The fact that a massive entertainments centre existed at all on this equally massive construction site only 46 weeks after bulldozers dug into the

strips of earth that would eventually support the airstrips is almost unbelievable. The same feeling of ingedulity must have been experienced by PSA's Regional Director, Maurice Chammings when he first looked out at the proposed site from the window of a shepherd's hut in August 1982...the land he saw then and the land on which I was standing in the Sports Centre was then little more than a bog."

Mr Chammings is reported to have been pleased with the progress considering the only materials available to them locally were stone and water everything else had to be shipped from the UK. By this stage of the operation a quarter of a million tons of supplies had been hauled across the decks of the Merchant Providence who was berthed at East Cove and had become

At the outset of the project communications were a problem, with the only link with the outside world being a Marasat system on Merchant Providence which provided a single telephone/telex line via satellite to the international world. In December 1983 Cable and Wireless opened the Earth Station in Stanley and on completion of the site offices at Mount Pleasant the system was utilised using a UHV radio signal link beamed from a disc aerial at the offices, received by a spe-

cial disc aerial erected in Stanley by LMA and then automatically beamed by the earth station via Intelsat to the UK. This provided computer links. telefax and telephones not only for business purposes but also enabled the work force to dial direct from public call boxes

LMA's Project Manager Wyn Kendrick was delighted at the progress that been made in such a short period of work, "I don't think that anywhere in the world there has been an airport built this quickly.

A shift system kept LMA workers busy around the clock and the article referred to the labourers as 'jet-age' prospectors who had come to look for gold in the dirt of the airport site. "An ordinary labourer can expect to take home a tax-free £10,000 in his pay packet at the end of a year with a £155 bonus on top of that." The workers also got a month's paid midterm leave in the UK. In turn, LMA expected every man to "do his duty" and had no hesitation in removing "misfits" who could disrupt their "well oiled ma-

LMA's Wyn Kendrick said it was an exciting concept to build something as big as an airport in a place like this. lo carve an international airport out of virgin turf 8,000 miles from base is a huge achievement, simply summed up by one of the labourers who told

Rob McBride, "There's going to be one hell of a party next April." On May 12, HRH Prince Andrew who was already in the Islands as a Royal Naval Officer, performed the

opening ceremony, unveiling a commemorative plague in the main hangar and received a relief map of the Islands crafted in silver which was presented by Oliver Whitehead, Chairman of the Joint Venture.

A flight on May 12 carried dignitaries such as Desence Secretary Michael Heseltine. Housing and Construction Minister, Ian Gow, Foreign Office Parliamentary Under Secretary of State. Tim Renton, Lord Shackleton, Lord Buxton, representatives of the main parties in the House of Commons and from the construction companies. Sir Rex Hunt. Falkland Islands Civil Commissioner and Commander of the British Forces Peter de la Billiere also took part.

A 'proving' flight was made two weeks prior to the official opening which had prompted spontaneous celebrations but the official opening was a more formal affair.

In his speech HRH Prince Andrew said the story of the construction of Phase 1, the runway and hangar was an example of "imaginative and meticulous planning with the heroic efforts of dedication of a British work force. He said the achievements and success was an example of "British ability and British engineering.

A cake measuring 10 feet by 20 inches depicting the airport's hangar and runway made in Paisley, was cut into 2,000 portions and distributed to Islanders.

Many of the Falklands population travelled from near and far to witness the opening of the airport which had been beyond their wildest dreams.

For those who travelled from West Falkland who rarely visited the East, it was phenomenal to see a runway and the largest building in the Falklands not to mention what could only be described as another town sitting on a site which previously had hosted nothing more than an a few sheep, cows and horses - and a road all the way from Stanley to the airport.

The airport offered a valuable link with Britain for all, but most importantly for those people of the Falklands still living with a sense of uncertainty, it offered security and showed a huge commitment by Britain which ironically, given the nature of the project, served to keep a lot of people in the Islands.

Not forgetting of course, it has also brought many people home.

# Travellers: make sure you're insured

DESPITE advice from the government, the Director of Health says many people still travel overseas with inadequate travel insurance, or even no insurance at

Norman McGregor Edwards says this lack of insurance can lead to serious problems and a huge amount of distress and expense if Islanders suffer accidents or health emergencies whilst overseas.

He is keen to reinforce the advice from the government and to leave Falklands residents in no doubt whatsoever that "travelling overseas without adequate travel insurance to cover accident and health emergencies, including repatriation, is very risky, highly irresponsible, and could lead to high personal costs.

There is a common misconception that if an individual is taken ill overseas while on private travel then the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) is responsible for paying their treatment costs and for their repatriation to the Falkland Islands or to the UK if that becomes necessary.

This is not the case. Mr

McGregor Edwards explains. "There is no such obligation on the Falkland Islands Government and it does not accept those responsi-

It should be clearly understood that it is the responsibility of individuals to take out insurance to cover such eventualities, amongst others, and this insurance should cover the cost of repatriation to the UK or the Falkland Islands if that proves necessary.

Likewise, the government does not provide any insurance for people travelling overseas for medical treatment. It is most important therefore, Mr McGregor Edwards says, that anyone travelling overseas for medical treatment arranges appropriate travel insurance (including medical and repatriation costs) for themselves and any relative or friend accompanying them.

"If an individual travelling as a patient is injured or taken ill with an injury or illness other than the one for which they have been referred overseas then there will be no insurance cover in place unless they have arranged such cover themselves.

"Another example is if a patient referred to UK for treatment falls down the steps of the aircraft at Ascension Island and sustains injury requiring treatment on Ascension (which is provided by a private company and is expensive) then they are not covered by any insurance unless they have arranged cover themselves; the patient will be personally liable for bills for such treatment.

"Similarly a patient will not be covered for any accident, illness or eventuality they sustain whilst walking around the local town or by using local facilities, or whilst staying in a bed and breakfast either side of treatment in a hospital in the UK or Chile.

Mr McGregor Edwards also stressed that FIG has no liability for loss of the personal effects or baggage of medical patients referred

"If luggage is lost or damaged in transit they will be covered only by the airline's insurance which is based on a nominal payment per kilo of luggage lost.

FIG has in place a group travel insurance policy which provides comprehensive cover for government staff travelling specifically on Government business overseas. However, there are some limitations to the extent of cover so it is advisable to check the policy carefully to ensure that all planned activities are covered (policy details are available to government staff on the public folders on the FIG computer network).

There are a number of companies and individuals in the Islands who offer comprehensive travel insurance at very reasonable rates. Mr McGregor Edwards urges individuals to take great care to ensure the insurance they purchase is comprehensive, "...and will meet all the risks that they may face whilst travelling out of the Islands, including medical treatment and repatriation costs.

If clients are in any doubt about the cover required for any particular journeys he urges then to "consult the insurance salesperson".

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### Wool report - week ending April 29 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

IN response to favourable currency movements last week. greasy wool prices tended slightly dearer at sales in Australia and New Zealand. Wool prices in Uruguay appeared to remain steady. No sales took place in South Africa.

Eastern State AWEX wool

prices were generally up in value by between one and four pence per kilogram clean. As shown in the "Mi-

cron Price Guide below.

□ Average and inferior style fleece wool lots continued to be discounted in the markets by approximately 8 to 10 p/kg clean as were "tender lots" of staple strength around 20 to 22 Newton's per kilotex. Finer micron (less than approximately 23 micron) with staple strength less than about 15 N/ ktex were discounted by up to 20 p/

kg clean.

Small discounts tended to be imposed on fleece wool lots with vegetable matter levels above 1%. The magnitude of the discounts ranged from about four to six pence per kilogram clean and were greater for the finer micron lots.

 Recent sales of Falkland Island wool in the UK have generally achieved world benchmark prices on a "Gross Bradford" p/kg clean basis.

 Net Bradford wool prices in the last several weeks (excludes selling, testing and other associated UK costs) have tended to be approximately 15 to 25 p/kg clean below Gross Bradford prices (varies with average micron of the lot).

 Falkland Island farmers are required to also pay freight costs to Bradford and other sundry insurance/inspection and storage costs once wool reaches the UK. While the cost of freight varies with wool yield, an average yielding fleece wool lot (68/72%), going to Brad-ford via the "typical" route, would incur freight/sundry costs of around 22 to 24 p/kg clean.

 Overall farm return per kilogram of fleece wool for Falkland Islands farmers, on a "Net Stanley" basis, is generally 35 to 50 p/kg clean less than the benchmark world price even though "Gross" world benchmark prices are achieved!

 It is interesting to note that current Uruguayan wool prices (source Uruguayan Wool Secre-tariat) quote "farm gate" prices for Uruguayan farmers that convert to p/kg clean prices that are only 15 to 20 p/kg clean less than the comparable world gross benchmark

☐ In New Zealand 78% of the 9.262 bales available to the trade changed hands, while in Australia 86.6% of the 51.026 bale offering (44.204 bales) were sold. Included in the offering were 5.078 bales of crossbred wool of which 93.4% was

Auctions continue in next week in New Zealand. Australia and South Africa where almost 90,000 bales will be offered.

# Lula says Argentine neighbours are 'jealous'

BRAZILIAN President Luiz Ignacio Lula da Silva yesterday acknowledged tension with Argentina but predicted it is only "a temporary problem" which he attributed to "jealousy" over his country's bid to take a permanent seat the United Nations' Security Council.

Yesterday was the first time the Brazilian head-of-state referred to the rift, which was sparked by Argentine government officials' complaints that Brazil was not paying enough attention to the Mercosur trade bloc.

"It is just a temporary prob-

lem between brothers and it should not affect our work toward integration in South America," said the centre-lest leader.

President Néstor Kirchner has not made public comments on the row, which was sparked by remarks from Foreign Minister Rafael Bielsa and other diplomatic sources.

Bielsa complained that Brazil had failed to satisfy Argentina's request last year for a fairer trade relationship, as Brazilian exports to Argentina have been increasingly outnumbering Argentina's exports to Brazil, Argentina's leading trade

partner. But Argentina's unrest is also reportedly linked to Brazil's ambitions to seek a dominant role in regional diplomacy by, among other things, clinching a permanent seat in the Security Council once the UN body is reformed.

Argentina instead wants a seat to be allocated to Latin America and to rotate among its members.

Lula said yesterday that Brazil's Security Council bid is causing "some jealousy" among neighbouring countries.

Argentina has also expressed concern at Brazil's efforts to mediate in a recent political crisis in Ecuador which led to the resignation of president Lucio Gutiérrez.

Argentina said that all mediation should proceed via the Organization of American States (OAS)

Argentine government sources said yesterday that Kirchner is likely to go to Brasilia next week, where Da Silva is hosting a summit of South American and Arab countries aimed at encouraging trade between the two regions.

The sources said that Kirchner and Lula might meet in private then to further chill the tension.

### Twentieth anniversary of Argentine-Chilean peace treaty

CONGRESS members plus Navy officers from Argentina and Chile gathered in the Beagle Channel on Monday to pay homage to Pope John Paul II in conjunction with the twentieth anniversary of the enforcement of the Peace and Friendship Treaty between both countries

Pope John Paul II played a leading role in stopping an imminent full-fledged armed conflict between the then dictatorships of

Argentina and Chile in Christmas 1978 over disputed islands in the Beagle Channel.

A special Vatican envoy. Cardinal Antonio Samoré, managed the signing of a first peace understanding in Montevideo, in early 1979, which finally led to the drafting of a Peace and Friendship Treaty that sealed the insular and sea influence dispute.

The ceremony was organised by Chilean Deputy Isabel Allende.

daughter of the former Chilean president deposed by General Pinochet in 1973 and Argentine counterpart Jorge Argüello who were accompanied by legislators as well as naval officers from both countries

The Chilean delegation left from Punta Arenas in two naval patrols Hallef and Alacalufe and later boarded the Argentine logistics vessel, Patagonia, anchored in the middle of the Beagle channel, a few miles northeast of Puerto Williams

Following the singing of national anthems and a joint religious service, legislators from both countries in brief speeches reflected on the anniversary and the decisive intervention of John Paul II. and finally held hands on the deck of the vessel.

The ceremony concluded with a flower offering to the sea.

# Uncertain future for racecourse

RACING fans are becoming concerned they may lose Stanley racecourse, as leases on the course expire in approximately nine months time and no plan to secure its future is yet in place.

Jockey Elaine Turner summed

Jockey Elaine Turner summed up the concerns of her colleagues. "I'm worried that if we don't put pressure on the government, they'll think they can just slide it away from us. We can't let that happen.

"The loss of the racecourse would affect everyone in the community, not just jockeys and horsey people."

The Falkland Islands Company (FIC) owns most of the course and leases it to the Stanley Sports Association (SSA). The remaining part of the course is owned by the government (FIG) and is leased to the Sports Association. The leases are due to expire in February 2006.

The government's Chief Executive, Mr Chris Simpkins, this week assured. "FIG has no current plans to determine the lease of that part of the racecourse which it owns."

Initial discussions were held early last year between the government, FIC and another landowner to explore methods of possible development of West Stanley, including the racecourse area.

At that time, the possibility of a land swap with FIC - so that the whole of the racecourse would be owned by FIG - was identified. However Mr Simpkins says to

However Mr Simpkins says to date, that option has not been

further explored, "...since FIG has been conducting a more wideranging review of its housing strategy. including the identification of other areas of land which are more easily capable of development"

Mr Simpkins added that work has begun on a Development Brief for West Stanley, "...which will stimulate further discussion on the racecourse which is likely to stimulate a review of the allocation of the racecourse for housing development. Whilst I cannot predict the outcome of any such review. I am certain that the expressions of concern for the retention of the racecourse will be very carefully considered."

Following the meeting in 2004, a working group was set up to carry the issue forward. However for some time, no progress seems to have been made.

As February 2006 looms, members of the Stanley Sports Association are keen to secure the racecourse's future.

Yesterday afternoon, the Environmental Planning Officer, Dominique Giudicelli, received a letter from the SSA Chairman, Owen Summers, asking for a progress report on the working

Ms Giudicelli told Penguin News said she is looking into the issue and hopes to be able to address it in next week's edition.

The oil exploration company reported yesterday that at four of the seven locations, dual targets have been identified, resulting in eleven prospects in total. "These prospects have a potential of over two billion barrels of recoverable oil."

Additionally, further recent interpretation of the 3D seismic data has yielded a further five prospects. "Three of these can be tested at the drilling locations already identified. In addition, numerous less well defined leads have been identified which will require further work before they can be moved to prospect status."

Dr Ian Duncan, Desire's Chief Executive Officer, commented, "The more we work on the 3D seismic data, the more prospectivity we see in this basin.

"The identification of these five new prospects means that, in the planned three well drilling campaign, all of the wells will have dual objectives."

#### Sth American/Arab declaration

ARGENTINA'S protest against the inclusion of the Falkland Islands in the European Union Constitution has continued to grab world headlines this week.

Now. South American and Arab countries have backed Argentina's call that the Falklands should not be termed British Overseas Territories in European Union documents as Argentina still lays claim to the Islands.

Reuters reported on Tuesday that a declaration has been signed calling on, "the Republic of Argentina and the United Kingdom to resume negotiations in order to reach, as soon as possible a peaceful, fair and lasting solution to the sovereignty dispute about the Malvinas question."

Councillor Norma Edwards yesterday responded, "Argentina needs to realise the reality of the situation, that we are a British territory; only then can we negotiate."

She added, "It's very difficult, anyway, to negotiate with a government that won't even talk to us."

#### Lord Triesman replaces Falklands' friend Rammell at FCO

LORD David Triesman is the new Foreign Office minister with responsibility for the Overseas Territories (OTs).

His appointment followed the launch of the Labour Government's third term in power.

Lord Triesman has been appointed as Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State. replacing Mr Bill Rammell, who has moved to a new appointment as Minister of State (Universities) at the Department of Education and Skills.

Councillor Norma Edwards yesterday said she "knows nothing" about Lord Triesman but added, "I'm sure that he will continue to give us the support

we've had from the Labour government in the past. I sincerely hope so."

Councillor Mike Summers said that, despite some preliminary research, he did not have a lot of knowledge of Lord Triesman or his background. however he commented, "...if he follows the same robust line as his predecessors on Argentina we will be happy.

"I believe he may have spent some time in the Department for International Development and will therefore have some existing knowledge of Overseas Territories, though maybe not the Falklands. We have requested a meeting with him if possible in

June when (councillors) Stephen Luxton, John Birmingham and I will be in London."

Councillor Edwards said she is sad to lose Mr Rammell: "Of all the people I've met who have held that position, Bill Rammell has so far been the best. He had a genuine interest in the Overseas Territories."

A spokesperson for Gilbert House said councillors have written to Mr Rammell to congratulate him on his new appointment and, "...to thank him for his genuine interest in the Islands and for all his hard work for OTs during his term in the Foreign Office."

A COMMON impediment when dealing with the military is the lack of continuity borne from short tours of duty; it's a problem *Penguin News* experiences first-hand with the Media Operations post.

Just as we develop a healthy working relationship with one friendly captain, they're off and we need to steer a fresh character towards our way of working. It's not a criticism of the military, just an unavoidable fact of

So too, the Falklands must once again seek to establish a relationship with a new Foreign Office Minister.

As predicted. Tony Blair is back - for the time being anyway - with a newly-appointed cabinet and we will now have to forge links with the new

Out goes Mr Rammell: just when we had hold of a minister who was keen to grip the Falklands cause firmly between his teeth, the election comes and we lose him to education.

With Kirchner's efforts to get all of South America (and half the Middle East it seems) behind him on his Malvinas quest, now, more than ever, we need a strong man on our side.

Despite his perseverance, in the end Mr Rammell didn't get anywhere with charter flights. Now, with Kirchner's accelerated pressure on the sovereignty issue, our expectations for the new minister will inevitably be greater.

Over the years Penguin News has learned, when first meeting a new media officer, it is best to cut to the chase, tell them how we like to work and, as it were, fast track the relationship.

I hope the Falklands has this same opportunity with our new man at the Foreign Office: the sooner we get him up to speed and championing our cause, the better. He'll need to hit the ground running.

THE lack of uproar at the cost of the new Town Hall roof surprised me. Sure. I've heard a few low-key rumblings around the place but we've not had a single letter nor have I received any irate phone calls about the issue.

What's going on? Is half a million an acceptable sum to spend on a

building that many people seem to think is nothing but an eyesore?

The fact that this enormous amount has been spent right at a time when the government says everyone must save, save, save makes the silence all the more surprising.

Has apathy set in?



#### Falkland mussels star in Brussels museum

ALCOMAYER ATER mussels from the Falklands are starring in a new year-long exhibition at the Museum of Natural Sciences in Brussels, which celebrates the country's 175 year history through its national dish.

'Mussels were a natural choice for the exhibition, because they are an important food for Belgians, says organiser Gerard Cobut.

Together with designer Katelijne de Kesel, the pair have created an informative, imaginative, interactive exhibition which takes visitors through the life cycle of the mussel, from seed to plate, and presents a wealth of facts, figures and quirky information, in a highly visual way.

For example, visitors can see which species thrive where around the globe, learn how mussels are helping advances in medical technology, how they act as indicators of pollution, how they interact

with predators and fouling organisms, and how changes in environmental conditions can be picked up by examining the chemical make-up of the shell through electron microscopy:

Plastination technology has been used to good effect, to display life-like preserved Mytilus edulis mussels from Holland, Mytilus galloprovincialis mussels from Spain, and Alcomayer ater mussels from the Falkland Islands.

Duncan Brake from the Fisheries Department organised collection and transport of the mussels, which were flown into the UK. then swiftly couriered to Brussels to begin the preservation process whilst still alive.

Anyone travelling to Europe this year who may wish to visit 'Simply Mussels' can find the exhibition at the Museum of Natural Sciences at 29 Vautierstraat, 1000 Brussels - 200 metres from the EU parliament.

#### New health director to arrive in July

THE new leader of the health service has been named.

Nicola (Nikki) Osborne has been appointed Director of Health Services, taking over from the present Director, Norman McGregor Edwards, who leaves his post on May 16.

# Court news

#### Drink driver ditches car after a bad day

A STANLEY man who pleaded guilty to a charge of drink driving was disqualified from driving for one year and fined, after he ended up in a ditch near Sapper's Hill

The court heard on Wednesday that on Monday night shortly after 10pm the police received a call from Melvyn McKay's brother who expressed concern for his brother's (Melvyn) safety.

Within an hour the police located the vehicle in the ditch but could not find the driver. A search for Mr McKay was initiated including help from the Mount Pleasant Dog Section.

A report was received at 1.20am that Mr McKay had appeared at a friend's house and he then proceeded to the Police Station.

During an interview with police. Mr McKay said he, 'had a bad day' because of personal problems and that he had left the Globe and 'went crazy'. He said he drove in the direction of Mt Kent and then turned around, he did not think he was too drunk and thought his driving was "OK".

In the vicinity of Sapper's Hill Mr McKay said a tyre blew out and he lost control of the vehicle.

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek said



there was little damage to the vehicle apart from a tyre which had come off. A road traffic sign was flattened near the vehicle.

A breath test gave a lower reading of 50 micrograms of alcohol per 100 millilitres of breath (the legal limit is 35mg).

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds told Mr McKay that she had noted his early guilty plea and that his circumstances seem very difficult at the moment

Mr McKay was disqualified from driving for one year, his license was endorsed and he was fined £250 plus £70 prosecution costs

The court gave him three months to pay in order to "give him a chance to get back on his feet again."

#### Physio tries out self-referral system

FROM the beginning of June the physiotherapy department will embark on a three month trial of self-referrals.

It is hoped this will reduce the number of people who are going to their GP with a problem that they know will need physiotherapy. Thursday afternoons will be kept available for this purpose.

Patients wanting a direct physiotherapy appointment will have to ring reception and indicate that they want an appointment with the physiotherapist for an assessment. The initial appointment will last approximately 30 minutes.

Physiotherapist Karin Daelemans says that, after three months, the appropriateness of referrals and the effect the self-referrals have on the waiting list will be revalued.

"If a higher than acceptable number of self-referrals have been inappropriate or the waiting list has gone up due to a flooding of the service, the facility will be withdrawn." Ms Daelemans said problems that are appropriate for self-referrals are, "Acute muscle or joint injuries that are not responding to the RICE principle (Rest, Ice, Compression and Elevation) or an acute flare-up or aggravation of a chronic problem like arthritis."

Ms Daelemans stresses however that the system is not a short cut to physio and GP referrals will get priority, adding, "if you wouldn't bother to go to your GP with the problem it might not be appropriate to see the physiotherapist."

She says it is not a "top up" service, "...to get more treatment after you have been discharged."

"If you have been discharged by your physiotherapist this is probably because you have achieved as much as you can with physiotherapy. It is up to you to continue the advice and exercises as provided by your physiotherapist."

Physiotherapists cannot prescribe medication so anyone needing a prescription should contact

#### Attempt to move vehicle is non-starter

A MAN who tried to move his vehicle off the Ross Road clearway while under the influence of alcohol was disqualified from driving and fixed.

Jorge Torrens was noticed by a police officer in a vehicle outside. The Waterfront at 12.20am on May 9. The policewoman offered her assistance and smelled alcohol on Mr Torrens. A breath test gave a reading of 51mg of alcohol per 100ml of breath.

Mr Torrens who pleaded guilty to being drunk in charge of a vehicle told the court that it had been his intention to move the vehicle some five metres to The Waterfront garage to avoid leaving it on the clearway. He said the battery was flat and that it had to be jump started to be shifted

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said she accepted his explanation and that it made the situation "somewhat unusual". However she said he had to take responsibility for his actions when in charge of a vehicle:

Mr Torrens was disqualified from driving for one year and fined £200 plus £70 prosecution costs.

Mrs Faulds reassured Mr Torrens that the restriction was only effective in the Falkland Islands and would not affect him upon his return home to Spain.

Following a row with her partner on March 6. Miss Lennie had broken four window panes in a flat on Jeremy Moore Avenue belonging to the Falkland Islands Government.

The Senior Magistrate, sitting with assessors Mandy McLeod and Richard Sawle, said that one of their main concerns was that the matter had arisen out of an argument with

Ryan Hawksworth. She said Miss Lennie was bound over for a year to keep the peace in general and in particular with Mr Hawksworth.

Miss Lennie is to undertake 40 hours community service within a year and is to pay £10 per week to the sum of £500 towards the compensation claim of £1900 for damage to the flat.

Also in court on Wednesday, a provisional date of June 2 was set for the trial of Cherilyn Julie King.

On February 2 Ms King pleaded not guilty to charges of assault occasioning actual bodily harm and common assault relating to an alleged offence which took place on January 1.

Further to the question in the March 24 edition of PN about warning of a tsunami which may affect the Islands; in the April 1 edition Councilfor Cockwell responded by saying that the matter would be discussed at the forthcoming General Purposes Committee (GPC) meeting. What was the outcome of that discussion?

Councillor Cockwell replied A Due to pressure of urgent items at GPC the issue was not raised. However I am contacting British Geological Survey (BGS) to confirm that the likelihood of a large tsunami in the southwest Atlantic is unlikely.

I shall let you have their reply.

Please define the term "re ciprocal medical treatment" as used when UK tourists visit these Islands and when Islanders visit the U.K. and unfortunately need medical assistance?

Director of Health Norman A McGregor Edwards provided the following answer. The easiest way to understand this is that the Falkland Islands and the UK each treats the other's residents as if they are their own.

Why is it that the Rookery Bay and Phillips Point

ranges are very rarely active even when they have been announced as being so?

I have visited them regularly at different times of the day when they were supposed to be live and found them to have been so on rare occasions only. One or two days they were actually active when no announcement was made. What are the rules governing this procedure?

Director of Civil Aviation Andrew Newman supplied the following answer

The Civil Aviation Department is responsible for the rules governing aviation safety in relation to

Range users (FIDF, gun clubs etc) must phone the Joint Operations Centre (JOC) at MPA and request that the range be promulgated as active for a particular period of time. #### .fk is now under local control

FEW emails will bounce back to fk addresses in future, thanks to changes in internet and email administration.

For the first time, all technical work on email addresses and websites ending in .fk is being done in the Falkland Islands

Full control of the top level domain for the Falklands - .fk - is now in local hands with FIDC's Tim Cotter being the administrative contact and Cable and Wireless here in the Falklands being the technical contact.

fk was registered by FIDC in 1997 with U-net who later became Via Networks doing all the technical work like creating the physical DNS records. A spokesperson for Cable and Wireless said this largely worked well, but in later years some serious delays in setting up new domains occurred which prompted both FIDC and Cable and Wireless to bring the whole process under local control.

The spokesperson said that all top level domains like .fk are registered with IANA who manage such things for and on behalf of the wider internet community. FIDC approached IANA in early 2004 to start the process of changing the technical contacts and updating the administration contact

information. However, this proved to be a very lengthy process requiring numerous forms and documentation to be prepared by FIDC, FIG. Cable and Wireless. Via Networks and even employees that had left FIDC. The process caught the attention of other bodies within the internet community who lent their support.

Tim Cotter explained that, to keep internet traffic travelling smoothly, most countries in the world have a code which can be tagged onto the end of website and email addresses to show where they are administered. These are called Country Code Top Level Domains, or ccTLDs. Other examples of these are co.uk or .cl for


Any internet user with a physical presence in the Falklands can apply to register a sub-domain under .fk, such as horizon.fk or fig.fk. With only about 30 sub-domains registered under .fk, it is one of the smallest ccTLDs in the world.

Anyone who wants to set up a new domain can now apply to Cable and Wireless. The application will have to be formally approved by FIDC and then Cable and Wireless will do the necessary engineering.

#### Alex shops for ten days and stays under budget

IT is almost twenty years since Alex Olmedo, Operations Manager of Falklands Brasserie lived in Santiago, Chile.

In that time he has, on occasion, spent a night in the city of his childhood but he has never really had the chance to explore

Alex recently visited Santiago for three weeks and here he shares his wonder at the changes the country's capital has undergone.

I WAS only a teenager when I lived in Santiago and I remembered it as a very polluted city, noisy, with people hanging out from public buses, beggars everywhere and a dictatorship government. After a lot of public protest, people being killed and international intervention, the dictatorship was revoked and democracy returned to rule the country

This meant freedom of speech and gave Chile the opportunity to develop and to be exposed to the world as an independent society. Chile has since worked hard to become one of the most successful economies in South America.

This time my stay was different. I was visiting Santiago to buy all the furniture, interior and exterior materials to complete my house which is being built at the moment

Last year I began to gather information from stores, requesting catalogues, visiting their websites and finding out about the several freight carriers from Santiago to Punta Arenas.

I was pleased to discover that with the introduction of the MV Saint Brandan, operated by Island Shipping Ltd. I could now consolidate a whole container in Punta Arenas. At the same time I was doing a parallel comparison with the UK.

Santiago has turned into a very modern city with excellent facilities for leisure, studying, medical services, the arts, restaurants, hotels, entertainment, transportation and shopping. I know that many like to visit Santiago but have probably have never realised the services that the city has to offer to our benefit.

I could feel a very positive sense of progress, urban style with sophisticated areas only to be compared with progressive big cities like New York, LA. London and so on.

Some areas still keep the romantic old fashioned style of cultural and intellectual European cities and I felt safe everywhere I went. I took the basic precautions when travelling in big cities, not carrying a lot of cash, preferably using my VISA card and although, I can pass as just another Chilean, I still felt like a visitor.

The new highway crossing Santiago, which was inaugurated while I was there, is a major improvement for the local population and

visitors - I was amazed at the ride from Las Condes to the international airport in only ten minutes.

Prices in general are very good due to our strong Pound: the exchange rate for Chilean Pesos-Dollar is low at the moment but still makes it very convenient for us.

After shopping for ten days non-stop and filling up a 40ft container with all the stuff for my new house, which included floor coverings, furniture, carpets, curtains, tiles, light fittings, a jacuzzi and all the necessary materials for the internal decorating. I was absolutely amazed at how easy the whole process turned out to be.

I never carried out one single item from the shop and all the cargo is now waiting to be shipped to the Falklands on the next St Brandan vovage

The best thing is that I was within budget and in my final calculation I was able to buy everything I wanted and more for only a quarter of my parallel comparison with the UK

Santiago has advanced tremendously and product quality, design and building materials are now comparable to any developed coun-

Before, I never imagined I could buy Italian designed furniture made in Chile at Chilean prices: well, it is now possible and if you have seen things you would like to bring from Chile then you need to know that it is very simple because the whole system has changed to our advantage.

Santiago is also emerging as a new centre for arts and culture, the museums are being refurbished, there are art galleries everywhere, installations open weekly, the theatres offer opera, ballet, orchestra concerts and many famous artists now visit Chile on a regular basis giving concerts to large crowds of

Santiago has also become a centre for huge international conferences and exhibitions and has in the last five years opened up its frontiers to thousands of newcomers from all over the world.

I was surprised at being able to speak in English almost throughout the duration of my stay in Santiago

Places for serious shopping are: Parque Arauco, Alto las Condes. La Debesa Outlet Mall. Alonso de Cordoba Street and Nueva Costanera in Vitacura for exclusive design at affordable prices for us.

Recommended places to eat are: Muuka in Avenida Italia, Providencia, Bellavista for fusion cuisine, many sushi bars. Frederick's in Santiago Centro for a touch of Britain, El Bosque Norte for American theme restaurants, Arauco Boulevard for good Italian meals, afternoon tea can be enjoyed at the Ritz-Carlton plus others, too many to mention.



# Susan and Liz take top dog trials prize

THE champion dog trials took place at Goose Green on the week-end.

A lovely sunny day made it a pleasant occasion for all concerned, although a few of the dog handlers and spectators looked a little rough around the edges from the previous evening's events.

First out to run was Neil Goodwin with Jet. The sheep came out and proceeded to head off in the opposite direction rather quickly and so it was rather unfortunate that by the time Jet picked them up they had gone back in behind the pen. While the dog did his best to get them back, as all dog handlers know, this is a pretty grim situation to end up in, and eventually Neil had to call it a day.

With the first dog called off, next up was Oscar Velasquez with his first

dog, Ronaldo

Ronaldo crossed over on his outrun but then completed the rest of his run efficiently and had the sheep in the pen and the course completed in 6 minutes 48 seconds (this was a 12 minute course). This was a very fast time but unfortunately no points are gained for speed.

Third to run was Les Morrison with Jewel Jewel let himself down with his outrun and ran very straight; he then recovered himself and, once he was around the sheep and got them near to Les. he soon remembered who the boss was and put on a good performance.

Unfortunately Jewel didn't manage to pen the sheep in the allocated 12 minutes and at the end of the day this led him and Les to step down into second place by half

a point.
Fourth out was Hew Grierson with Mick. Mick did a very wide outrun, casting right behind the letting-out pen and coming in to pick up the sheep. He then worked the sheep wide and steady; things were going very calmly and it looked like Hew and Mick just might gently sneak the sheep into the pen, when time ran out on them. They were fourth overall.

Next up was Susan with Liz. Things didn't get off to a perfect start as Liz had spotted (or rather smelled) the sheep Hew had just

turned out the gate and off the course and wanted to go off in that direction and get those sheep. Susan called her back and sent

Susan called her back and sent her out again and this time *Liz* spotted the right sheep and picked them up.

She then went on to work well; things went quite smoothly and some fancy work had to be produced from both handler and dog around the pen to eventually pen the sheep (a few times they had two or three sheep in the pen only to have them escape again before they eventually got all five sheep in).

Liz did a sterling job and the sheep were all penned up in 10 minutes 18 seconds, securing first place.

Sixth handler out was Paul Peck with Ret

Bet did an excellent outrun and things were going well, although perhaps just a little fast, thus leading one sheep to get rather stroppy and trying to get out on his own. Bet did very well though, got the sheep under control with the other four and did some very good work thereon and around the pen.

By this time she had settled down well and had everything under control: this appeared to make her more relaxed and she could be forgiven for thinking she was back at home at this stage with her handler using some rather colourful language! Bet was unfortunate not to pen the sheep.

Next out was Tony 'Turtle' Hirtle with Twig. Handler and dog looked well in control and relaxed.

Twig saw the sheep and left Tony doing a nice wide outrun and the first minute into this performance,

it looked like this was going to be the one that might wipe the board.

However Twig went a little too wide on the outrun and unfortunately then passed the sheep she was supposed to be picking up and went to try and lift the sheep in the letting out pen.

At this point the five sheep headed in the direction of West Falkland; Tony who was probably a little slow on the uptake after the night before, then proceeded to have a severe panic attack when he realised what had happened and, try as he might, he couldn't whistle at all!

His voice too was a little feeble and he had to take a few deep breaths and compose himself before he could then find it in himself to regain his whistle and call *Twig* away from the pen, redirecting her to the sheep she was meant to be looking for.

By the time she spotted them the sheep had gone completely out of sight of handler, judges and spectators. However *Twig* with all her experience brought them back to Tony nice and steady, had everything completely under control and the sheep knew it. They proceeded to pull out all the stops and show what she was made of and smoothly took the sheep through the drive and into the pen as soon as Turtle got the gate open.

Thus, even with the hiccup and having to haul the sheep twice as far as the rest of the dogs, she completed the whole job in 9.43 minutes and came in third place.

Last out was Oscar Velasquez again, this time with Queen.

Queen did an excellent outrun and lift and at this stage looked like she might be going to put on the show of the day, however Oscar then had some really bad luck as Queen fetched the sheep down along the fence by the spectators and although she tried her best to prevent it happening the sheep headed straight for a gate that had been left open.

It was very unfortunate but once through the gate and among the crowd the dog, although still working well, didn't have a hope of being able to get the sheep back to Oscar and he did the only thing he could at that stage and called off.

However Queen had by then already shown herself to be a bitch to look out for in the future.

All in all it was a good day - with good weather and good sheep, well trained and good to work this was quite a treat to see.

A good crowd gathered to watch the trials with some 35 vehicles lined up at one stage.

The judges - Sam Sinclair, myself and Tony McMullen - are three very experienced dog handlers (that is very experienced - not very old - even if one of us was suffering from arthritis.)

The judges were ably assisted and kept in check by time keeper Bobby Short

Les Morrison could take credit for having bred six of the eight dogs at the Champion Trials, although I would like to point out that, although they might be his genetics, the first and third placed dogs were born and raised at Main Point!

# 'We have lived 1982 on a day to day basis'

Kingdom on November 19, 1981 for a patrol in the Arabian Gulf.

After participating in a major Mediterranean exercise, and four days before her planned return to Portsmouth, the ship was diverted to the South Atlantic on April 2. 1982, within hours of the Argentine invasion of the Falkland Islands.

On board was Mark Hiscutt, who, as a result of the Sheffield's diversion to the South Atlantic, was forced to write a short note to his fiance. Kirsty, telling her to cancel their wedding, planned for May 8.

The couple eventually married a matter of weeks later - once Mark had returned from war - however their future together was not to be anything like the happy scenario the young couple would have envisaged.

Just a few days before their original wedding date. Mark was in the gun bay of HMS Sheffield when she was hit by an Argentine Exocet. The missile did not explode but caught

Mark said he first saw the plumes of smoke when he got up onto the ships's fo'c's'le. "It didn't register to me that people could be dead that didn't register until later."

Mark is reluctant to talk in detail of what he witnessed on Sheffield. However, he admits he ventured back into the ship twice while she burned, protected only by a respirator, or gas mask.

"At that time in the Navy - not

breathing apparatus and those we did have were being used by the people fighting the fire.

"The trouble with using respirators in a smoke filled compartment is that the filter clogs up quickly and you then start breathing in all sorts of rubbish.

Along with his friend 'Bones', Mark began to look for "Number One - our laundry man". Bones started to feel unwell and the two headed forward to climb a ladder out: while on the ladder. Bones, who was 6'6" collapsed and Mark, who weighed a mere 8½ stone at the time. held him up. "I started shouting for help but couldn't be heard through my respirator so I took it off and kept shouting." Eventually help arrived and Bones was moved up on deck. He stopped breathing twice. however the ship's doctor managed to resuscitate him.

Incredibly, after that scare, Mark returned into the ship once again to look for Number One. "I started feeling a bit funny this time - I didn't collapse but I had to get up for fresh air." After a quick rest he joined the north to Ascension Island aboard the fire fighting effort.

Sadly, the fire could not be conhours later, the ship's Captain, Sam Salt, gave the order to abandon ship.

HMS Arrow came alongside and news. Sheffield's remaining crew clambered aboard. Mark recalled: "I think that was the scariest part - we had to jump over on to Arrow and if you

missed, you'd end up between the two ships."

The next day they transferred to RFA Fort Austin and later moved tanker British Esk

Back at home in the UK, ninetained and approximately four or five teen year old Kirsty was writing Mark a letter when she heard of the Sheffield's demise on the television

> She soon received a telegram from Mark to say he was alive and uninjured - at least physically.

For, since those fateful events of May 4, Mark has suffered from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

He said he suffers terrible guilt after the death of a friend. Tony Marshall. During Sheffield's patrol in the Arabian Gulf, Tony had been looking forward to returning home to his wife who, Mark recalls, was expecting their first child.

"But unfortunately he didn't come home. He's still down here and that's where my guilt comes from. He should have come home and I should still be here.

"He had a wife and baby to come home to; Kirsty was only 19, she could have gone off and found someone better than me."

Mark and Kirsty were finally able to tie the knot on June 19, 1982 and they went on to have six children. Mark remained in the Royal Navy until 1988. He now works for oil giant BP and he lives daily with PTSD.

Kirsty summarised the situation: "He came back a changed person - he didn't come back the same person who went away," and the first change she noticed in her husband's behaviour was in his eating:

"He became a compulsive eater. Something like a trip to the supermarket would become an ordeal for Mark because they are so crowded. By the time we'd come out, he would have started to eat the shopping."

He also began to drink heavily and said, "It was easy to hide it in the

Navy I never became an alcoholic but I wasn't far from it.

Kirsty said she and Mark "live 1982" on a day to day basis and their marriage has been influenced irrevocably by the war.

She admitted they have never "had fun together" and Mark's relationship with his children, particularly the elder two, has suffered from his PTSD. Mark admitted: "I enjoy the company of the children but I don't have any fun with them."

Kirsty said she "walked on eggshells" in her relationship with Mark and had to watch what she said. This took its toll on her and she developed depression and life-threatening anorexia.

"My depression covered up Mark's problems. Over the years it didn't get better and eventually manifested into anorexia when I was thirty.'

As Kirsty slowly began to recover, Mark started to regress. Kirsty explained, "He didn't have to be this big strong person who had to cope for me. By 1999 I was as recovered as you can be from anorexia and he began to go down hill."

One morning in 1999 Mark crumbled. Kirsty recalled: "All of a sudden he came downstairs, sat on the stairs and burst into tears. I couldn't quite understand why all this had come to a head.

"I phoned his work to tell them he wouldn't come in. I spoke to his occupational health advisor and she said Mark had mentioned the Sheffield to her and she wondered if it could be related to that."

Mark contacted Combat Stress, a charity which specialises in helping those of all ranks from the Armed Forces and the Merchant Navy suffering from psychological disability as a result of their service.

He now stays at a treatment centre two or three times a year and Kirsty attends a family support

Mark described consultant psy-

chiatrist Morgan O'Connell, the driving force behind Combat Stress, as "God" and added, "...the man should be cloned before he dies."

With the support of the charity behind them. Mark and Kirsty felt able to make a visit to the Falklands this month.

Kirsty said, until the visit, her outlook of the Falklands was "fairly confused.

"I had a grudge against these islands. I couldn't understand why people would want to live here and why they wouldn't just go and live somewhere else.

"I don't mean to be horrible but I was only 19 years old at the time. 1982 has always been in our faces and always in our heads.

She said the return visit had been a "rollercoaster ride" but had given them a chance to discuss "what we couldn't discuss when Mark came home." She said, for the first time since 1982, she had been able to fully emphasise with Mark's pain.

Mark added, "Now we have been able to get it into perspective and to see that the Islands are worth it. We've seen how peaceful and content the people here are.

"It will never justify the deaths of my mates but it justifies what we

He paid tribute to the actions of Islanders in 1982 and described the fight against Argentina as. "...a joint effort - yes, we came as a task force but the Islanders did their bit too.

"It was a team effort that liberated the Islands and the Islanders played their part. On May 4, the 23rd anniversary

of the bombing of Sheffield, Mark visited the memorial to the ship on Sea Lion Island. Beside the memorial he placed a plaque made of Portland Stone and steel, bearing an engraved poem by Steve 'Smudge' Smith (below left) entitled The Bravest of the Brave. Mark described the plaque as "a gift for my mates."

When asked whether she would recommend that other wives accompany their husbands on these personal pilgrimages to the Falklands. Kirsty chose her words carefully.

She said "It is something that Mark and I had to do, needed to do. But I think some other wives are too bitter to be able to come.

Before travelling to the Islands this month Mark visited his friend, Dave Roberts, and his wife Anita. Dave also served in 1982 and Mark said his friend's life has been 'screwed up" by PTSD.

Mark asked Anita if she wanted him to take anything to the Falklands on her behalf. She asked for a yellow rose to be laid at the memorial on Sea Lion Island, something Mark and Kirsty duly did.

When Mark asked if she wanted anything brought back from the Falklands. Anita's answer was short but heartbreaking.

She said simply: "Yes, bring my David back."

# News from the Planning and Building Committee

WITH twenty-one applications for planning permission and sixteen for a building permit, this month's meeting was a little less busy than the last

Just one member, Graham Middleton, was absent with apologies. Chaired as usual by the Hon-Richard Cockwell, committee members the Hon Norma Edwards. Gerald Cheek, Les Harris, Mike McLeod and Mike Harris dealt with the open session of the meeting in just over one hour and twenty minutes with two members of the public attending

Following the usual business of declarations of interest, confirmation of minutes of the previous meeting then matters arising there-from, the committee reviewed five applications which had previously been deferred.

Four of these received conditional planning permission (a sign to be displayed at Atlantic House for Energise FI Limited, the renewal of temporary planning permission for two Wyseplan units on KTV's site off Dairy Paddock Road, alterations to Malvina House Hotel on Ross Road for Stanley Services Limited, and permission in principle for a pair of semi-detached houses at 112 Davis Street for Roger and Anne Howells) whilst the outline application for eleven houses to the rear of Racecourse Road submitted by FIG was again deferred.

The Environmental Planning Officer (EPO), Dominique Giudicelli. suggested that a Development Brief for the whole area be drafted, including the Racecourse and land to the west of the Community School and members agreed that this was a practical approach to assist them in reviewing the proposal.

Just one new application for renewal of temporary planning permission was then considered. This was for the siting of two containers adjacent to Décor Services warehouse on Lookout Industrial Estate and members agreed to grant permission on the condition that they be painted and maintained to the satisfaction of the Committee. The whole subject of container siting on the Estate is to be looked at and reviewed at a later meeting.

The following new proposals

were then reviewed and granted conditional planning permission: siting at 15 Callaghan Road of a purposebuilt sound-proofed recording studio for Jock and Liz Elliot; a two storey dwelling with integral garage at 6 Sulivan Street for Ross Poole; a domestic garage for Lee Molkenbuhr at 19 Sulivan Street: a domestic garage and enclosing fence at 4 McKay Close for Hamish Wylie; a Portakabin for storage at Mullet Creek for Pat Short; siting of a mobile home for occupation by a family member at 22-24 Davis Street for Robert King: a dwelling with attached garage for Geoffrey Loftus at 15 Biggs Road; a lean-to extension to their main technical building on Ross Road for Cable and Wireless Limited; and the display of four directional signs for the Falklands Gun Club at the Phillips Point Range and surrounding roads.

There were no less than six new applications in outline (for permission in principle) to be considered. Two were deferred and the other four received such permission: for a dwelling at 108a Davis Street submitted by Richard Leyton; a dwelling at the rear of 1 Dairy Paddock Road for Stewart Wilson; warehousing units at Plot 20 Kiel Canal Road for Peter McKay; and government's proposal for a wind farm including access roads and service cables to be sited at Peat Bog Paddock, Sand Bay on East Falkland.

In the case of the last proposal. the EPO had prepared an Environmental Impact Assessment for the project and suggested that a baseline survey be carried out in order

to have a record of what flora and fauna is present in the area prior to the development proceeding.

The survey should focus on monitoring bird activity and distribution. in particular. It was agreed that the survey, which would also provide information to monitor any changes once the wind farm is operational, be prepared prior to submission of the detailed plans.

The two outline applications which were deferred were both in respect of proposed dwellings: that for Graham Fiddes was on land at 28 Davis Street where there were concerns expressed about the new dwelling having an effect on the rear neighbour's privacy and amount of daylight, with the result that the applicant is to be asked to provide some indication as to the size of the house he wishes to build. The other, for a one-and-a-half storey house on land at the rear of 15 Brandon Road for Richard Rodgers, raised concerns about the effect the development would have on light available to the existing house and the intrusion of privacy. It was decided here that the EPO would discuss the matter further with the applicant.

Members then moved on to review the decisions taken by Building Adviser Graham France on applications submitted under the Building Regulations 1999 for a building per-

There were sixteen of these of which nine had been granted a building permit and one submission, for a domestic garage, was found to be within the limits of an 'exempt' structure. In the majority of the other cases, further information had been requested and was awaited

At the conclusion of the open part of the meeting, the date for the next was agreed which will be on Thursday, June 2, commencing at 9am and be held as usual in the Liberation Room of the Secretariat.

#### Zoran thanks HMS Sheffield survivor for his Falklands War efforts

A YOUNG Islander studying at Peter Symonds College in Winchester has thanked a Falklands War veteran for his efforts in 1982.

Zoran Zuvic was at HMS Collingwood, a naval training facility in Gosport, taking part in a demonstration of engineering project work when he met Commodore Nance OBE, commander of the base.

Zoran said he looked at Commodore Nance's medals and noticed one was the South Atlantic Medal; Commodore Nance explained he was a survivor from HMS Sheffield and Zoran, "...thanked him for what he

Zoran and his team mates were at the college to present an engineering design, a security locker for emergency safety equipment, which they worked on entirely in their own free

## Whole food and holistic health - cold season remedies

AS THE temperature drops, our bodies become less resistant to cold viruses, which cause coughs. runny noses, sore throats and influenza type symptoms.

Many people are unwilling to put up with these irritations and search for the miracle drug or herb that will suppress the symptoms. enabling them to carry on as normal

Holistic remedies work in a different way. Although herbs are very effective at alleviating symptoms, it is very important to make sure that you also get a good rest and nourish yourself with home cooked foods. Contracting a virus is a sign that we need to slow down - be sure to have early nights and take things easy during the day Rest is one of the main ways in which we can strengthen our immunity

Beneficial nutritional supplements

Fluids: It is important that you drink a lot of fluid during a cold. Drinking a sufficient amount enables your immune system to work more effectively, a dehydrated body is a haven for viruses. Water and herbal tea are the best drinks to take, room temperature freshly pressed juices of lemon, carrot or apple are also good. Adding boiling water to

lemon juice will destroy most of the vitamin C content, add lukewarm water instead. Try to have a home-made soup or broth for at least one meal of the day.

Cold busting foods: Garlic helps to reduce excess catarrh, eat at least two raw cloves a day (have on toast or stir into food at the end of cooking) or take a garlic supplement. Shitake mushrooms help to boost immunity. Onions and ginger are also good ingredients. If you like spicy food then cayenne

pepper is also very beneficial.

Vitamin C rich foods: Vitamin C has been shown to be effective at reducing the length of colds. Foods such as kiwi, guava, green pepper and potatoes in their skins are particularly rich. Use the freshest vegetables and cook very lightly as Vitamin C content decreases with age and heat.

Beta carotene rich foods, such as the red. orange and yellow fruits and vegetables, are also rich in bioflavonoid and vitamin C. Dark green leafy vegetables are good especially parsley. kale. watercress, savoy cabbage and

Zinc rich Foods: Many people are deficient in this mineral, which helps to shorten the life of colds. Sources include pumpkin seeds and alfalfa sprouts. Fruits (cooked, dried or raw) are also helpful: try apples, dates, figs and berries of all kinds.

Grains that are recommended for excess mucus include millet and barley. Try to avoid wheat as this can increase mucus production. substitute with small amounts of spelt or rye.

#### Immune Boosting Nutritional Formulas:

ensure maximum absorption of nutrients and to ensure against deficiency in general it is a good idea to take a daily multivitamin and mineral. Even if you take no other nutrients, it is well worth taking this. Years of intensive farming have stripped the soil of many nutrients, coupled with longer storage times and more consumption of fast foods, this means that our diet these days tends to be lower in nutrients than that of our ancestor's.

#### Cut down on mucus forming food

Dairy: All dairy produce is mucus forming. Goat's, sheep. rice, oat and soya milk products are preferable to cow's milk products, which should be avoided totally. Eat dairy in small quantities, if at all, while you have a cold.

Avoid sugar: Avoid refined sugar, sweetened foods and sugar rich drinks, even pre-prepared fruit juices (fresh home-made juices diluted with water are fine in moderation).

Good quality Manuka honey is beneficial, but don't stir into hot drinks - heat destroys the beneficial ingredients.

Avoid wheat: Check how you react when eating wheat products. Wheat allergy symptoms include excess catarrh, asthma and itchiness (itchy throat, scalp and skin irritation).

Avoid processed foods: Avoid pre-packaged foods that contain additives you would not use in your own cooking. (E numbers for example).

Avoid alcohol: Alcohol is mucus forming, yet a small hot toddy will not cause too much of a problem if you are accustomed to alcohol. Add hot water to a shot of whiskey or brandy with some whole cloves and a slice of ginger. Allow to cool a little and then add the juice of a fresh lemon and some manuka honey.

Tea and coffee: Substitute your usual cuppa with herbal teas that will help to relieve your symptoms.

# Recipes for the Falklands with basic ingredients

#### Guinness and honey glazed pork with creamy Irish Colcannon

Ingredients for glazed pork

½ pint of Guinness

fl oz clear honey

9 oz muscovado sugar

4 - 5 lb skinless, boneless loin of pork, tied into a roll.

Splash of white wine few sprigs flat leaf parsley

#### Method

Put Guinness, honey and sugar into a pan and reduce by almost half to form a sweet syrupy glaze. Allow to cool.

Season pork with pepper and salt and roast for 20 minutes at 180C/Gas 6.

Remove from oven and brush all over with most of the glaze. Cook for a further 40 - 50 minutes brushing and basting the pork until it is caramelised and glazed.

Remove pork from the roasting tray and leave to rest.

Pour the remaining glaze into the tray and add the wine. Bring everything to the boil, simmer for a few minutes until you have a thick gravy.

Carve pork into thin slices and place on top of the Colcannon.

Drizzle remaining syrup on the plates.

Ingredients for Colcannon

21/2 lb of potatoes well scrubbed 4 oz butter

5 oz back bacon finely chopped I small Savoy cabbage finely shred-

1/4 pint double cream

#### Method

Bring potatoes to boil in a large saucepan of water and simmer for 15 - 20 minutes or until the flesh is tender when pierced.

Heat quarter of the butter in a saucepan, then fry the bacon and half the cabbage for five minutes and set

Mash potato until smooth. Heat cream with remaining butter and, when almost boiling, beat into the potato.


Add bacon and cabbage to

potato and mix, season if you wish.

To use the remaining cabbage simply heat a knob of butter and cook the remaining finely shredded cabbage for five minutes, so it's still just a little crunchy. Season with salt and pepper.

#### Wool report - week ending May 6 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices had a rather volatile run on the worlds auction floors last week. Prices were under considerable downward pressure in South Africa (down almost 6% as a result of a strengthening of the rand). Prices were generally unchanged in New Zealand, but were up in the critical 23 to 26 micron range in Australia. Wool prices in Uruguay also appeared to remain steady.

■ Eastern State AWEX wool prices were generally up in value by between 1 and 3 pence per kilogram clean for 23 to 26 micron good quality fleece wool lots. As shown in the attached "Micron Price

Guide

Generally, premium and discount rates for "style", staple strength, and vegetable matter contamination remained steady. As an example "average and inferior" style fleece wool lots continued to be discounted in the markets by approximately 8 to 10 p/kg

Discounts continued to be imposed only when vegetable matter levels increased to above 1%.

☐ Falkland Islands' farmers appear to be struggling to achieve "Net Stanley" returns for fleece wool, closer than 35p/kg clean to the world benchmark price. But "Gross" world benchmark prices are usually being achieved. Net Stanley returns for finer lots often average closer to 45p/kg clean below the world benchmark price.

Uruguayan "farm gate" prices for the week were quoted at 20 to 32 p/kg clean below world "gross" benchmark prices for 21.5 to 22 micron merino lots (yield 69% dry) and approximately 37 p/kg clean below the world benchmark price for 28 micron Corriedale lots (yield 74% dry). Prices quoted applied to well-prepared fleece wool lots. Source Uruguayan Wool Secretariat and South American Wool Report.

In New Zealand 78% of the 19.360 bales available to the trade changed hands, while in Australia 87% of the 62,742 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 4,552 bales of crossbred wool of which 90.4% was

#### Robert Hall looks at UK meat sheep trends

LIVEWEIGHT new season lamb prices have declined in the last week to average 141.92p per kg for the week ended May 4. This was as a direct result of increased throughputs. Prices for old season lambs have been relatively stable at 127.29p per kg.

The price of cull ewes at auction markets in the week ended April 30 averaged £30 per head, down more than £4 over a period of three weeks. Prices are now about £10 per head less than a year ago as a result of more animals in the supply chain.

Exports of sheep meat in the first two months of 2005 were down around 2,000 tonnes on the same period of 2004. French demand was weaker as a result of plentiful domestic supplies at the beginning of

the year.
UK imports of sheep meat were also lower than a year ago in January - February. Around 1,000 tonnes less was imported from New Zealand. Although more bone-in

chilled cuts were imported than in the same period of 2004, to account for 35 per cent of all imports from New Zealand, less frozen boneless meat was imported. Frozen bone in cuts continued to account for 38 per cent of imports.

In 2004 the EU-15 imported 231.000 tonnes product weight of fresh/chilled and frozen sheep meat from non EU-15 countries, just fractionally less than the year before.

Although more sheep meat was imported from Australia and Argentina than in 2003, less was imported from New Zealand. For the first time ever the New Zealand sheep quota with the EU was not filled. In the first four months of 2005, 40 per cent of the annual import quota with both New Zealand and Australia was

Comparisons of usage with 2004 cannot be made because the 'first come, first served' method of licence allocation did not come into effect until May 2004.





# **Budget decisions loom**

"NO ESSENTIAL services or investments in the future of the Falkland Islands" will be threatened by the new budget, councillors have assured.

Legislative Council's 2005/6 Budget Session begins on Tuesday morning and. Councillor Mike Summers says, despite tight financial constraints. "...we remain in a strong fiscal and economic position to take advantage of improved circumstance or new opportunities."

Once again, a poor illex squid season means the government's financial belt will have to be tightened.

Mr Summers says a "great deal of work" has already taken place on the budget, and most of the background work for next week has been done.

He and his colleagues are confident that they can set a budget, "...that safeguards the Consolidated Fund for future years, but still delivers the full range of services that the public have come to expect."

He says that once again the budget will be "tight" and, "...we are requiring all departments to produce savings in order to get as close as possible to a balanced budget." He added, "In doing that, no essential services or investments in the future of the Islands are threatened."

The Budget Session of Legislative Council begins at 9am on Tuesday. May 24 in the Council Chamber of the Town Hall, after His Excellency the Governor has inspected a Guard of Honour of the Falkland Islands Defence Force.

His Excellency the Governor will deliver his annual Address to the Nation during the session and the first stages of the Finance and Appropriations Bills will take

Only two questions for oral answer will be asked during the meeting. Councillor Birmingham will ask Councillor Summers about the progress of the reindeer imported from South Georgia six years ago and he will ask Councillor Cheek, in light of the Islands' increasing birth rate, if the Education Department has plans being drawn up to accommodate the extra children.

# Racecourse future: public's views count

THE wishes of the community will be given priority in deciding the future of the racecourse area, the Environmental Planning Officer has confirmed.

As reported in *Penguin News* last week, Dominique Giudicelli received a letter from Mr Owen Summers of the Stanley Sports Association (SSA) which raised issues relating to the leases for the racecourse from the government (FIG) and the Falkland Islands Company (FIC) which expire in 2006.

Mr Summers also said the SSA would not be able to meet the cost of the relocation of the racecourse.

Ms Giudicelli confirmed there is no expectation for the SSA to pay for relocation but. "...if the landowners develop the area they would be expected to provide an alternative facility." This provision exists in the Stanley Town Plan.

Ms Giudicelli will be producing a development brief in the next few months: "This is a more detailed document than the Stanley Town Plan. All the issues relating to the area should be covered including the land use, layout, landscaping, utilities (sewerage, water and electricity) and drainage, which I understand is a concern in that area."

A public consultation period will be held on the issue lasting six weeks: "FIC and FIG as landowners, will also be involved."

Ms Giudicelli commented, "I am already aware of the community's views relating to the racecourse, due to the comments received on the outline planning application for housing to the east of the racecourse.

"Once all the comments have been received, an amended Development Brief can be adopted by the government, to become planning guidance to guide future development in the area."

She added, "I think this has good potential for providing a well-integrated and vibrant extension to the town, whilst taking into account the wishes of the community."

STANLEY is to lose its butcher's shop at the end of this month.


After only five years in business. Raymond Evans, Director of Freshco, confirmed yesterday that the butcher's shop will close its doors because, "...we are just not selling enough meat at the present moment."

He said sales have dropped off to such an extent, "...we know we just can't keep going, otherwise we'll run at a loss."

At a meeting of the Falkland Islands Development Board on Tuesday, General Manager Julian Morris said the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) plans to enter the local meat market early next month, "...with support from retailers and users of local meat."

Mr Evans says the management of Freshco does not feel they can compete with FIMCo.

"There's not enough room for more than one outlet."

I DOUBT yobs in the UK will be trembling in their trainers this week, with the Prime Minister's pledge to restore 'respect' in society, but most

people would acknowledge something needs to be done.

While the banning of hooded sweatshirts and caps in shopping malls strikes me as a rather Draconian measure, I do think Blair is spot on when he says British people are fed-up with intimidating street corner thugs, yobbish behaviour, Friday and Saturday night binge-drinking which makes town centres no-go areas for respectable citizens, or the low-level graffiti, vandalism and disorder that makes the law-abiding majority afraid and angry

It's easy to sit back and feel smug, wrapped up in our safety blanket that is the Falklands. But while we don't have problems with graffiti and vandalism, alarmingly, the rest could be said to apply more and more to

While I would never describe them as intimidating thugs, anyone out for a drink or meal on a Friday or Saturday night can't help but notice the large numbers of children (and we're talking as young as 11 or 12) who are mixing with much older - and normally, drunk - crowds. Although they are young, en mass they can be an imposing presence but that's not what troubles me; my concern lies with the education they are receiving on these nights out.

I refuse to believe their parents don't care what their children are up to; maybe it's just easier to let your twelve year old head out for the night than face yet another argument and accusations of being the most unreasonable person on earth. But if these parents saw the sights - and heard the language - their children are witnessing in town, I believe they'd think again before letting them out.

Let's not get things out of proportion. The situation here is nowhere near as severe as the UK - after all, it's still safe to walk the streets alone at night. But it would be best to work on the problem of antisocial behaviour before it escalates and 1 believe this is a job for all adults - not just parents.

The theory is simple. Short of making it illegal, it's impossible to get children off street corners, so instead, next time you're out for a drink, try to think about how those young eyes are viewing your behaviour. For it is the example we set today that will be followed in years to come.

If we're grumbling in twenty years' time that young people don't know how to behave in a "socially acceptable" fashion, we'll know exactly who to blame - ourselves.



#### 'World class job' by FIMCo team | Fishing rights for Falkland companies?

THE prompt action of the crew on board the charter vessel Marianne Danica has prevented the loss of £30,000 worth of meat being exported by the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo).

FIDC General Manager, Julian Morris told board members that crew members noticed the freezer container was not functioning on the journey north and managed to get it transhipped at sea within a very short period of time

The killing season has finished at the abattoir with 23,200 animals slaughtered. The second shipment of meat has now arrived in the UK and a payment of £300,000 has been received £47,000 of stock remains unsold to date.

Mr Morris said a full update would be given when the third shipment arrives.

Mr Morris said the financial situation has improved in so much that in the past the abattoir made "less of a loss if they did nothing, now the amount received exceeds costs. Last year every animal through the abattoir cost money but this year every animal has saved money. The

goal of the board is to break even for the whole operation in 2007. The present level of subsidy will continue this year and next.

However there are still obstacles to be overcome - the recent weight restrictions on haulage vehicles (15 ton per vehicle) leaves the present sheep shifting trailer over the weight limit. An exemption was issued for the shifting of livestock this year, but it is an issue that is to be looked at with PWD and to be raised at the Rural Business Association.

FIDC's involvement with FIMCo has been significantly reduced with Mr Morris and the FIDC's Financial Controller, Bernadette Lang, now dedicating only a third of their time to related business.

Mr Morris said he could not speak highly enough of the team at Sand Bay under the guidance of Operations Manager John Ferguson who have done a "world class job

Subject to approval it is intended that Mr Ferguson will be promoted to General Manager of FIMCo with effect from July 3, and Bernadette Lang will continue as Financial Advisor to the company for one year.

FALKLAND fishing companies could soon have the right to fish in Falklands waters for an extended period, if the new Fishing Policy is approved.

Following concerns expressed that the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) could be parting with a valuable resource. Penguin News asked the councillor responsible for fisheries to explain the current and possible situations regarding fish-

Councillor Cockwell said at present fishing companies obtain licenses on a short term basis with no guarantee that they will be able to renew when their licence runs

"This situation gives the com-pany no security and thus they are not able to invest in long term projects and, to a certain extent, it also makes it hard to raise the capital to purchase new and more economic vessels. Further, from the FIG point of view it has become difficult to expand the income gained from the fishery through li-

The proposed new Bill (if passed) will give companies the right to fish the resource for a period of twenty-five years. These rights would be referred to as Individual Transferable Quotas (ITQ).

Councillor Cockwell continued, "The companies will still have to pay an annual fee to fish the resource (similar to the present license system) and the amount of effort will still be calculated annually by the Director of Fisheries as will the license fee. FIG will still

retain the power to close a fishery for conservation reasons. It is in-tended that a successful company would be able to negotiate an extension of their ITQ before the twenty-five years expire.

Councillor Cockwell said the companies will gain the security of a long term fishery, "...which will hopefully enable them to invest in long term projects to the benefit of both themselves and the Falklands.

"Obvious examples are onshorefreezer storage, containerisation and on-shore value added processing, but extended marketing contracts and other marketing schemes would also be feasible.

The fishing companies would also be able to trade in the property rights so that efficient and go-ahead businesses could expand by purchasing other companies ITQs (providing that there is a willing seller)."

The ITQs would only be owned by Falklands-registered companies which in turn are owned by people with Falkland Islands Status and who are normally resident in the Falk-

A benefit to the Falklands other than that of increased commercial activity, says Councillor Cockwell, is that by "encouraging Falkland Island fishing companies to develop their industry", income from taxa-

tion should increase.

He added, "The process of producing this Bill has been very complex and time consuming but hopefully it will be agreed by ExCo that it can be published and referred to Legislative Council soon.

#### Bower Green and SSL assist farmers

AT LEAST nine farms have bales of wool that have yet to be shipped north this season.

At a time of low prices and at a crucial stage of farm cash flow the situation carries grave implications for those farmers who are yet to see their season's work make a re-

Robert Hall of Falkland Wool Growers has been liasing with the Falklands shipping companies/ agents. Darwin Shipping and Stanley Services, in order to identify suitable transport for the remaining wool in Stanley, as well as with Bower Green to identify cheaper UK transport solutions for wool haulage.

Mr Hall says Bower Green has been "most helpful", and recognises the urgent problem of unshipped wool.

In recognition of the on-going commitment of farmers in the Islands and our long standing business relationship, for the remainder of this season Bower Green will accept twinned containers by having two directors (family members) ignore employment Health and Safety issues and roll the bales out them-

"This will allow wool shipped in containers to be transported in twinned loads and benefit from significantly cheaper rates than has hitherto been the case.


'He added Falkland Wool Growers are extremely grateful for this undertaking by Bower Green on behalf of our Farm Principals

WOULD Councillor Roger Edwards please explain his remark in the Penguin News of April 29 regarding the Town Hall roof?

He said he had believed that the original estimate was £300,000 and described the revised sum of £536,000 as "ridiculously high". He then added "but that's the market forces of today." How can an estimate be so far out?

Regarding Morrison (Falklands) Ltd projects, let's recap: FIDF new complex - approximately £500,000 over estimate; Infant and Junior school - approximately £400,000 over estimate; a badly laid road foundation that had to be lifted and relaid - a mere £30,000 approximately; now the Town Hall roof, £236,000 over estimate, fact, as given to us by the Councillor.

Why does Morrison's contract not contain penalty clauses?

Why do councillors allow these colossal amounts of money to be paid out?

Is this waste of money going to be allowed to continue?

Councillor Edwards replied, A"I only quoted the figure that was put forward in the 2004/5 budget. I had not added to that the 2003/4 budget.

"In the draft programme produced last year total money voted in the year 2003/2004 was £217,520 and the proposed budget 2004/5 accepted at last year's budget was £330,000. The total money allocated to Town Hall modifications was £547,520. So in fact the Town Hall roof is coming in under expected funding.

"The new FIDF complex was a project from before my time on council however the overspend is

not strictly true.
"The project was started before final planning costings and everything else was finished and. as time went by, they realised difficulties had to be overcome and in the end it cost a lot of money. But it was not £500,000 over estimate because effectively there was no initial costing.

The overspend on the Infant and Junior School was partly due to additional groundwork that had ben underestimated in the planning stage; also there were underestimates at the planning and costing

stages.
"The only badly laid road I can think of that your correspondent might be referring to is a road on East Stanley development. It was not the contractors fault at all, but they couldn't get the right level of compaction of material that was necessary so they had to take the material out and use another.

The Morrisons contract does not contain penalty clauses because it is a partnership. Morrisons and FIG work together to achieve the cheapest and best solution on all contacts.

"The arrangement Morrison is cost plus 10% and we have access at all times to their books, showing payments, receipts etc.

We try to be supportive, not adversarial.

"All the capital programme is drafted and budgeted and approved by the whole council.'

IN Penguin News of May O6's General Practice column, Director of Health Norman McGregor Edwards states that Islanders with no travel insurance who visit the U.K. for specific medical treatment, will

not be covered for medical any needs either side of that treatment.

He states in PN May 13 "Your Questions Answered" that the UK provides free medical treat-

ment for Islanders and the Falkland Islands provide free medical treatment for UK residents (reciprocal medical treatment) Aren't these two statements in opposition?

A Mr McGregor Edwards commented, "No they are not. The UK NHS will not repatriate Islanders to the Islands, nor will we repatriate UK residents to the

"In addition, there are some procedures and treatments not available to UK residents on the UK NHS which our residents might benefit from.

The strong advice from this Department remains that no-one should travel anywhere out of the Islands without adequate travel insurance. This is as true of the UK as it is of the rest of the world."



#### Work soon to start on playground site

"And finally a huge thank you to all others who offer up prizes for raffles, donate meals, financially support teams or simply allow employees time off to train/compete within the local community and also overseas."



#### Cllr Luxton: how student housing eligibility will work

WITH regard to your editorial of May 6. I believe the issue of student eligibility for Government housing requires some clarification.

The previous policy meant that anybody who falls into the loose definition of "a student" is given priority in the allocation of housing. This was originally intended to benefit returning graduates who would be displacing overseas contract officers, but subsequently the definition of "student" has been broadened considerably, as a wider variety of courses have become available - many of which are equally as important to the Falkland Islands as a degree quali-

The effect of the change approved by Executive Council is that priority for students will still be given, where it is justified and in the interests of the Falkland Islands. It is left to the discretion of the Housing Committee (who may take advice from others) to give priority where appropriate.

The original aim remains unchanged, that is to encourage trained local people to return to the Falklands by making housing available to them where possible. For example, the previous policy would have meant that a student with a degree in Latin, or History of Chinese Folk Arts (a real course!) would be given the same priority in housing as a teacher. doctor, lawyer, plumber or electrician, which is obviously not in the best interests of the Falkland Islands economy. The new policy will allow the allocation of our limited housing stock in the most appropriate manner.

Considerable discussion was devoted to trying to reduce the concept of "desirable qualifications" into a written policy, but while it is quite easy to see whether any particular qualification would be useful to the Falkland Islands, it is reduce that into a simple written policy which would always work proved impossible.

In addition to this, there is single persons accommodation available at the YMCA and Lookout Lodge, which was not the case going back a few years. The final factor is that the available pool of Government housing is completely inadequate for the demands placed on it; it is not possible to house everybody who would like to be housed and the reality is that this is unlikely to change in the foresecable future

I hope this will clarify the issue for any current and prospective students and reassure them that this is not a fundamental change in policy, but a way to allow the Housing Committee to use common sense to target the (very limited) Government housing resource at where it is of most benefit. I would like to take this opportunity to urge students who are studying overseas and who will have a housing requirement, to make that known at the earliest opportunity via both the Education Department, and where appropriate, the Human Resources Department.

#### Gun Club 'block books' range

AS SECRETARY of the Falklands Gun Club I was very disappointed in the "questions answered" section of last week's PN

The Falklands Gun Club is the primary operator of Phillips Point Range and is responsible for "Block Booking" the range.

The club is a forward thinking, fast developing club. We have had 514 shooters on the range in this year alone, and in the week ending May 14 the range was in operation on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday!

Submitting NOTAM's is not as easy as one might think NOTAM's are Notices to Airmen. giving indication to air users that the range is in use.

Bearing in mind that we operate at a safe height of 1000 feet (approx. 333 metres), we do not impact much on air traffic. The majority of our mid week shooters are service personnel from Mount Pleasant (MPC). The Hillside Physical Training Instructor's book clients in, on our behalf, on any day of the week and we need to be prepared to open the range on any day

Originally we submitted NOTAM's on an as needed basis but found ourselves short on more than one occasion

The Joint Operations Centre at MPC are reluctant to accept 'emergency NOTAM's', ie with less than 24 hour's notice, so we decided to block book the range as being open. This has meant that the range is often listed as open when in fact the range is not being used on that day.

During long summer nights we also like to go to the range and practice; the block booking of the range allows us to utilise good evenings rather than being restricted to shooting in poor weather.

We have a club policy of informing Stanley Tower whenever the range is open and in use and up to this date the Director of Civil Aviation seemed happy with that policy.

As a simple rule of thumb for any one approaching the range, if the range is in use the red flag will be flying, if it is not, you are safe to go on the range!

On a more personal note it would have been nice for the individual asking the question to have either publicly or privately made the approach rather than hiding behind the veil of 'Your questions answered"

# Cllr Summers: 'why SSL shares could not be sold to Falklands interests'

COUNCILLOR Summers has reiterated the reasons why the government did not offer shares in Stanley Services Ltd for sale to Islanders when a number were recently bought by an overseas company.

*Penguin News* contacted Mr Summers, one of the government's directors on the board of Stanley Services Ltd. with a criticism from a *PN* reader.

The correspondent said "it would have made more sense" to have sold shares in SSL to local entrepreneurs, instead of to an overseas entity. "This in turn would have created more revenue for the Islands which must surely be important at this time, given the steep fall in fishing revenues; perhaps such a course of action might also have saved the enormous sum of money spent by FIG in legal fees?"

Councillor Summers said PN's correspondent's comments were made. "... on the basis of a mis-understanding," and the tranche of shares could not have been sold to Falklands interests for a number

of reasons

"As has been explained on a number of occasions, the business of SSL is regulated by a Shareholders Agreement that was negotiated and signed in 1987. Amongst a host of other provisions (which are not relevant to the question being put) each of the shareholders has the right of pre-emption over any shares offered for sale, and an effective veto in all matters requiring Board or Shareholder decisions.

"This is a matter of contractual fact, and cannot just be overturned unilaterally by FIG (however much we might or might not

wish to do so).'

He continued, "Following the acquisition of shares by FIG and S and JD Robertson from the then bankrupt Hogg Robinson Holdings (HRH) (using the rights of preemption) there were two share-

holders in the company. Each had the right, under the same Share-holders Agreement that remained in place, to pre-emption and veto. HRH was not free to sell to other interested parties.

"S and JDR made it clear to FIG that it would not agree to the sale of the newly acquired HRH tranche of shares to Falklands interests, but that as part of a package it would agree to FIG selling its original 45% to Falklands interests."

Councillor Summers said the fact that, at that point, FIG owned around 65% of the shares, and S and JDR owned around 35%, did not give FIG the right to take unlateral action. "This is a fundamental principle of company law, A majority shareholder can only undermine the rights of a minority shareholder if they have at least 75% of the shares (your readers may have heard much about this recently in respect of the Glazier takeover of Man Utd).

"So the HRH shares simply could not have been sold to Falk-lands interests either directly or indirectly, no matter how much any of us may have wished it or however much economic sense it may have made, because S and JDR did not agree to it."

Councillor Summers said, whether the government likes or dislikes S and JDR's reasons for not agreeing is "not an issue" - "they had a contractual right to make that decision and did so."

"However." he added, "we achieved the objective of selling FIG shares to Falklands interests as part of the package - but not the first tranche."

Whomever the shares had been sold to, there would have been legal fees involved. Councillor Summers said, adding, "FIG has nevertheless made a very substantial margin between the cost of purchase and the price of the sale after allowing for those fees."

#### Port Harriet tillite better than all the rest

THE quality of the Tillite material currently being used for capping the Stanley to Mount Pleasant road was up for discussion again at the Public Works Department Committee.

Members agreed that the surface is performing better than past materials

In this financial year to date, 10.2 kilometres have been completed on the Mount Pleasant road averaging eight metres wide, a further 2.4 kilometres has been capped on the North Camp tracks averaging six metres wide.

The amount of material produced and used to date is approximately 49,300 tonnes which is

close to that originally estimated.
Director of Public Works
Manfred Keenleyside said that he
had been out after heavy rain and
that the surface was still performing "better than other materials;"


he added that emergency stops had been successful when the surface was not dry.

Mr Keenleyside said that the increased camber would allow the road to dry off faster but that there will be times when the surface will be "a bit sticky" just as previous surfaces have at times been less than perfect, however, "there is no perfect unsealed solution."

Councillor Mike Summers suggested the testing period be held at the back end of winter when frosts tend to loosen the surface.

Mr Keenleyside said this was a particular problem with all unsealed roads in the Islands and explained that in most areas where such surfaces are used the capping may only experience a few freezes - that is stay frozen for most of the winter - whereas in the Falklands the surface can freeze and thaw on an almost daily basis.

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


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# Hidden Personalities: Owen McPhee looks back on life and war in the Falkland Islands

THE people of the Falkland Islands first heard of the outbreak of World War II on the BBC Overseas Service News at 7am on Sunday, September

Governor and Commander in Chief of the Islands Henniker Heaton KCMG called out members of the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) to assemble at the FIDF Headquarters at 4pm. All FIDF members in Camp were ordered to attend the shearing shed of their employer by noon the following day, and all employers were to release any employees who may be required for public service.

The requisitioning of ships and buildings had taken place the previous day and lengthy defence regulations were gazetted on September 4; these were followed in quick succession by orders for the control of wireless telegraphs and shipping, the appointment of postal censors, air raid wardens and arrangements for lighting blackouts

For twenty-year-old Owen McPhee living at Pebble Island on West Falkland, the news of war meant that he and two other islanders. Tommy Anderson and Jack Ashley, were immediately despatched to Marble Mountain to keep a constant lookout for shipping activity; any sightings were to be reported by radio to Pebble settlement.

Getting the radios of that era to the top of the mountain was no mean feat. The six volt batteries used to power the radio were transported on horseback nestled in front of the rider.

Owen said that several days later the front of these riders' trousers disintegrated from the acid that had spilled from the batteries during the iourney.

Owen and his colleagues spent three months keeping a 24 hour watch from the mountain top; four hour watches began with a walk to the top of the mountain from Marble Shanty and were followed by an eight hour break before repeating the process.

Owen left Pebble to work as teacher at Port Howard and there undertook training for the FIDF with

the West Yorkshire Regiment.

His next move took him to Stanley where he worked for the Royal Navy at the ammunition store: it was Owen's task to keep temperatures at the right level within the store to prevent any deterioration of the explosives

One incident he recalled was when the isolation hut used for dangerous cargo "went up in smoke." He said the lack of road meant the fire fighting appliances couldn't get to the site and although he and others were trained in fire fighting they never got a chance to try, as it was far too dangerous in the area.

Although the war in Europe was physically far away, civilians in the Falklands endured many of the same restraints as their compatriots in the

Blackout times were advertised in the Weekly News, ration books and billeting notices made their appearance, there was postal censorship and travel restrictions were introduced

The full impact of the war was realised in the Falklands when the ships Exeter, Ajax, Achilles and Cumberland returned to Stanley at the end of 1939 after the Battle of the River Plate.

Casualties were 64 dead and 45 wounded. HMS Exeter was so badly damaged that most of her crew had to be temporarily billeted ashore with the people of Stanley. Among her crew were two Islanders, Steward Berntsen and Stoker Gleadell. The hospital was full to capacity.

As was the case with many Falkland men. Owen's next job took him to sea, on board the Fitzroy. He was soon in Montevideo with the Fitzroy in dry dock; although they were unaware at the time, the ship was being prepared for a secret mission - Op-

eration Tabarin. On their return from dry dock at the beginning of 1944 the Fitzroy took cargo on board and was soon under way for a destination unknown. The crew's wives and families had no idea of the Fitzroy's

After calling at Goose Green for whereabouts. mutton carcasses their next stop was

the Antarctic as part of a mission to establish a British presence in the

On arrival at Deception Island, Owen said, their first task was to paint Argentine flags out and hoist a Union Jack before they unloaded the Hope Bay was the next stop

where it was intended to set up a base, however ice prevented the Fitzroy from going in so they made their way down the coast looking for somewhere to land.

They ended up at Port Lockroy. Here landing was possible and a hut was built for the Antarctic base. This, said Owen, was the "beginning of BAS". (British Antarctic Survey)

Owen said there were no radio communications because of the war and the two ships, Fuzrov and HMS William Scoresby communicated between themselves and with other ships involved in the operation, Newfoundland sealing vessels Trespassey and Eagle, with morse

On they went to South Orkney where they again made the British presence known with Union Jacks nailed to the old seal station build-

On return to the Falklands, Owen went to Charles Point (near Sparrow Cove) as a signaller for the FIDF. He said this was a relatively quiet time although one incident sticks in

"The Fitzrov was returning from Montevideo and we always asked her to stop as there was a danger of a foreign crew taking her over on the way down. The skipper didn't take any heed and carried on sailing through so we fired a shot at him - he soon stopped then."

The war drew to a close and on June 14, 1945 during the King's Birthday Parade the Governor took the salute from a march past and addressed the parade, informing the FIDF that they were to revert to peace establishment at midnight on July 2, 1945.

However Owen's wartime experiences were not over yet. He, with many others, put his name forward

to attend the official victory parade in London in 1946. "On a Sunday afternoon the public selected the 14 to go." The detachment sailed from Montevideo on the troop ship Empire Cromer and were billeted in the great camp in London set up in Kensington Gardens.

It was Owen's first time in the UK, "...we didn't know what to expect, and as you can imagine the conditions weren't too great.

His first meal in a London restaurant left a lasting memory - rhubarb pie which, because of rationing, had

The representatives of the FIDF duly returned home and Owen took up the post of storekeeper and teacher at Teal Inlet. Here he met Mari McCallum who was living at the settlement with her sister Doreen. They married in 1952 and had

two sons. Terence and Ian who were bought up at Teal Inlet, and a daughter Natalie Ian and Terence both became accomplished steer riders in their youth although these skills were obtained without their parent's knowledge. "I think I would have put my foot down if I'd known," said Owen.

The family returned to live in Stanley in 1971 and Owen's musical abilities were put to good use as accordionist in Rowlands Ragtime

Owen, Marj and Natalie returned on the Norland in September. Owen recalled how their home on John Street was occupied by four Royal Engineer Officers, "...we had to get two to move out so that we could get in." The family home had suffered no damage and had been well cared for by the Royal Engineers.

Having just celebrated their 53rd wedding anniversary I asked Owen and Marj what their secret to a happy future together is.

Owen thinks he has recently discovered the answer to a long and happy marriage; "Listen to your wife," he says with a chuckle.

Looking back over the years and at the many changes they have witnessed Mari and Owen say that they are particularly glad to have lived on the farms at a time when the community spirit was alive and well. "One of the nice things in our young day was when the dogs barked and someone appeared over the hill on a horse."

Owen thinks that the present air services provided for the Islands by the Falkland Islands Government Air Service (FIGAS) and the air link with the UK are two of the greatest improvements he has seen take place.

However, camp roads are probably the best thing that has happened to the Islands in recent years, agree the couple. But, in retrospect, " would have been nice if the roads had come along while we still had the large Camp communities.'

## The uses of antibiotics past and present

AN 'Antibiotic' is a drug that kills or slows the growth of bacteria.

Antibiotics are one class of a larger group known as antimicrobials'. The group antimicrobials' includes anti-viral, anti-fungal, and anti-parasitic drugs. Antibiotics are relatively harmless to the host (you), and are therefore used to treat infections. Antibiotics target 'Gram positive'. 'Gram negative' or in some cases both positive and negative microbes.

When they were discovered, antibiotics were labelled 'magic bullets' because they targeted disease without harming the patient taking them, unlike the treatments for infections available before, which included poisons such as strychnine.

Antibiotics are not effective against viral, fungal and other nonbacterial infections. This is why antibiotics are not given for coughs, colds and sore throats (most of are viral in origin) unless there is an underlying bacterial infection

The effectiveness of individual antibiotics varies depending on the location of the infection and the ability of the antibiotic to reach said infection. Oral antibiotics are the simplest and usual 'first line' approach, with intravenous antibiotics reserved for more serious cases. Antibiotics may sometimes be administered 'topically', via things like eye drops, creams or ointments.

If you ask most people what the first antibiotic was I expect most would say Penicillin, but in fact work on anti-bacterial agents was going on way before Penicillin emerged in the 1940s.

In 1888 the German scientist E. de Freudenreich isolated a bacterial secretion and noted its antibacterial properties. Pyocyanase slowed the growth of other bacteria in situ and was toxic to many disease-causing bacteria.

Unfortunately, Pyocanase's own toxicity and unstable nature stopped its use as an effective, safe antibiotic within the human body!

In 1932 a German scientist,

Gerhard Domagk investigated the antibacterial properties of certain dyes. One of these was a red dye given the name Prontosil. Prontosil. a sulfonamide, was used to treat infections in humans and by today's more broad definition likely qualifies as the first successful use of an oral antibiotic.

Back to Penicillin – although its discovery is credited to Alexander Fleming, a young French medical student Ernest Duchesne studying Penicillium glaucum in 1896 originally discovered the antibiotic effect.

Alexander Fleming who (re) discovered it in 1928, noticed the lack of bacterial growth around a blue-green mould that had contaminated a Staphylococcus culture. Fleming concluded that the mould was releasing a substance that was inhibiting bacterial growth. He grew a pure culture and discovered the mould to be a fungus - Penicillium notatum. He named the bacterial inhibiting substance Penicillin after the Penicillium notatum that released it.

After conducting more experiments Fleming was convinced penicillin could not last long enough in the human body to effectively kill bacteria and stopped studying penicillin after 1931.

Penicillin, however, would prove to be the discovery that changed modern medicine. In 1939, Howard Florey and a team of researchers at Oxford University made great progress in showing Penicillin's ability to kill infectious bacteria when given to humans. This eventually led to the commercial production of penicillin.

During World War II, penicillin made a huge difference to the number of deaths and amputations caused by infected wounds amongst Allied forces. Its availability, however, was severely limited by the difficulty of manufacturing large quantities, and by the need for frequent doses. The kidneys excrete penicillin about 80% of a penicillin dose is cleared within three to four hours of it being given. It became common practise to collect the urine from patients being



treated so that the penicillin could be isolated and reused.

When we look at the 'time line' for antibiotics showing when they were released onto the pharmaceutical market it is during the 1980's and early 1990s that the majority of 'new' antibiotics came about. Most of them, with the exception of the Quinolone group, were in fact just variations of already established formulations with bits added or altered to change their range of actions. If we look at our standard antibiotics used at KEMH every day we can see just how long they have been around

1942: Benzylpenicillin – known as Penicillin G is the injectable form of penicillin

1949: Chloramphenicol – still widely used mainly in an eye ointment

1950: Oxytetracycline – first of the 'Tetracycline' group of antibiotics

1952: Erythromycin – first of the 'Macrolide' group, useful in patients allergic to penicillins

1956: Phenoxymethylpenicillin – known as Penicillin V, the orally active form of penicillin

1960: Metronidazole – effective against anaerobic (non oxygen requiring) organisms

1961: Trimethoprim – still used for urinary tract infections

1962: Fusidic acid – penetrates bones, useful in orthopaedics

1964: Gentamicin – injection, used in severe infections can be harmful to kidneys

1966:Doxycycline – longer acting from the 'tetracycline' group, usually given once or twice a day

1967:Rifampicin - still used as part of standard Tuberculosis eradication treatment

1970: Cefalexin - 'Cephalosporin' group, first generation, a

variation on the b-lactam ring structure

1970 – Flucloxacillin – modified basic penicillin structure, useful for skin and wound infections

1972 - Amoxicillin - modified basic penicillin structure, has some activity against gram negative organisms

1977 - Cefuroxime - injectable 'Cephalosporin', second generation, used widely after surgery

1981 - Co-amoxiclay - the modified penicillin structure amoxicillin with added activity due to it's combination with clavulanic acid

1982 - Ceftriaxone - injectable 'Cephalosporin', third generation, reserved for serious infections

1986 - Mupirocin - used in nasal and topical creams and ointments

1987 - Ciprofloxacin - first 'new' antibiotic since 1970, 'Quinolone' group, useful in serious infections

1990 - Clarithromycin - new drug in the 'Macrolide' group

1992 – Tazocin – an injectable modified basic penicillin structure piperacillin with added activity due to it's combination with tazobactam

There has been a serious slow down in the development of 'new' antibiotics since around 1994. Whilst there are a number of 'useful' new antibiotics for gram positive infections (Methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus MRSA being the headline grabber) just out or in the pipeline there are very few in development for multidrug-resistant gram negative bacteria.

Tigecycline is the only broadspectrum (activity against some gram positive and negative microbes) antibiotic due for launch in the near future. It will be available in the US in the next month or two and in the UK towards the end of the year.

It is important that we give and take antibiotics appropriately to stop microbes becoming resistant and leaving us unable to overcome them in the future.









#### Wool report - week ending May 13 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices continued to firm slightly at sales in Sydney and Melbourne, Australia last week for fleece lots in the micron range relevant to Falkland Islands farms. Prices eased in New Zealand for lots generally broader than those produced in the Falkland Islands.

As shown in the attached "micron Price Guide" price increases were generally in the range of 1 to 5 pence per kilogram clean.

Premium and discount rates for staple strength, wool style, staple length and vegetable matter contamination remained steady. As an example "average and inferior" style fleece lots continued to be discounted by approximately 8 to 10 p/kg clean for lots in the 21 to 23 micron range and by 12 to 25 pence per kilogram clean for lots finer than 20 micron.

Sound, stylish, fleece wool and skirting types attracted most attention from buyers in auction floors in Australia and New Zealand last week

In New Zealand 72% of the 9,389 bales available to the trade changed hands, while in Australia 90% of the 53,000 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 3.278 bales of crossbred wool of which 91% was sold.

 Auctions continue next week in New Zealand. Australia and South Africa where approximately 85,000 bales of wool in total will be offered for sale.



AN Argentine environmentalist has been found guilty of blocking the path of a warship two years ago and sentenced to six months in prison by a Spanish court.

Daniel Rizzotti, captain of Greenpeace's ship Rainbow Warrior. said that he was happy with the outcome of the trial against him. as prosecutors had requested a fouryear sentence. The court in Cadiz did not say, however, whether Rizzotti will effectively have to serve the time in prison.

## Budget deficit forecast but 'finances in good shape'

"THE public finances remain in good shape, even in an interim deficit budget situation and the prospects for continued economic growth are sound"

That was the message delivered by the Financial Secretary. Derek Howatt, at the end of the government's budget session this week.

As was the case last year, the choices made during the session were not easy. Mr Howatt said, due to the impact of a much lower level of fisheries licence fee income, owing to the failure of the illex fishery this year. However, despite another tight budget round, all essential services are maintained, "broadly at existing levels."

A deficit of £1.4 million is now expected at the end of this financial year, compared to a deficit of £3 million forecast a year ago. The reason for this £1.63 million improvement, Mr Howatt said, is due to a net increase in revenue, "mainly from taxation and investments."

Next year's deficit is expected to be even less - around £400,000.

Measures approved under the new budget include a 1.5p increase per unit of electricity, a general 3.5% increase in house rents, an increase in postage on airmail letters to 55p and on postcards to 45p, an increase in vehicle licence fees and an increase on customs import duty on cigarettes and alcohol of 15% and 5% respectively.

An increase to charges at Stanley House Hostel from £1.50 to £2 per day was not approved; instead an increase of 10% to £1.65 per day was approved, along with the principle for incremental increases for

There is to be no change in in-

come and corporation tax rates and allowances, embarkation tax, passenger tax, customs fees and harbour dues or water, refuse and service charges.

The level of the child allowance is to remain unchanged at £53.50 per month per child and civil servants are to receive a cost of living pay award of 1.5%.

Councillors allowances for the new council (due to be elected towards the end of the year) will be increased by 7%, representing the total increase in the government salary scales over the four year life of the current council.

Reflecting on the week's proceedings. Chairman of Standing Finance Committee. Councillor Mike Summers commented. "One cannot be entirely satisfied at setting a deficit budget but, in all the circumstances, a deficit of less than £400.000 is not too bad at all. We have been able to retain the projected level of reserves at 2.5 times operating expenditure which is in line with the Islands Plan. This is after taking out from income a further £2 million anticipated reduction in illex fee income.

"We have tried to be fair and equitable, and to adopt the user pays principle as far as is possible, and have been able to maintain levels of investment in the key production areas of fisheries, agriculture, tourism and minerals, as well as general development through FIDC, infrastructure, education and health services."

Legislative Council coverage in Penguin News next week will include reports on Bills passed by the House and councillors' motion for adjournment speeches.

## Governor: relations with Argentina 'disappointing'

"THERE is little I can say that is positive in terms of relations with the Argentine Government." His Excellency the Governor has reported in his annual Address to the Nation.

Speaking to Legislative Council and the Islands as a whole on Tuesday. Howard Pearce described as "regrettable" Argentina's refusal to discuss co-operation on a high seas fisheries agreement for the region on terms which the UK and Falkland Islands Governments could accept.

"...despite there clearly being a mutual interest in improving the quality of regional fisheries management."

He said there had been some progress in discussions between the UK and Argentine Governments on a feasibility study concerning the removal of mines from the Falklands, however on the issue of charter flights. "...there has been no movement, and there is currently no sign that the Argentines are prepared to discuss it on terms which would be acceptable to Falkland Islanders."

Mr Pearce's annual address was shorter than in past years; having consulted on the matter, he decided to focus his remarks on "some personal impressions of the events of the last year and the prospects for the next twelve months." His more traditional department by department report will be available in written form, from the Government Secretary.

In his address on Tuesday. His Excellency commended councillors' attendance at overseas meetings, saying they are right to take, "pevery opportunity to put the Falklands' case for self-determination to the international community," and said it was important to welcome, "as wide a variety of overseas visitors to the Islands as possible."

Mr Pearce also touched on the nature of the relationship between the Overseas Territorics and the UK Government. He said the white paper Partnership for Progress and Prosperity, published by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in 1999, describes the relationship as a "new partnership" and bases it on four fundamental principles: self-determination; mutual obligations and responsibilities; freedom for the territories to run their own affairs to the greatest degree possible; and a firm commitment from the UK to help the territories to develop economically and to assist them in emergencies.

WHILE the budget may not be cause for delirious celebration, councillors seem to have achieved a better level of damage limitation than most of us dared to hope for.

Last year we were fearfully staring a £3 million deficit in the face and, while £1.4 million is hardly ideal, it's a much rosier picture. Half a million for 2005/6 is even better news.

The hike in electricity is painful to most and will likely hit businesses hard but, overall, the effect on our day to day lives from this year's budget should be minimal, particularly compared to last year.

Hell we've aren best hold of the belief and the belie

Hell, we've even kept hold of the holiday credit scheme.

The doom and gloom which preceded the budget round has highlighted the importance of economic variation - a lesson hard-learned, first through wool and now illex. The greater the diversity of industry the better our chances for financial opportunity.

We still have a strong loligo fishery, tourism, agriculture and a promising aquaculture future, not to mention oil prospects. Illex could well disappear: however we could benefit from switching our focus from what we've lost to what we've got and give these other industries the support they require to

Hopefully the penny pinching mindset we've acquired in this past twelve months will endure - after all we had far too much wastage going on before but not to the extent where our prospects for future growth will be hindered.

THE Sunday Express article created quite a level of head scratching this week and even after having read the article I'm still a little puzzled as to the point of it.

The headline inevitably provoked a level of anxiety for people here and particularly for families abroad but once people had the chance to read the actual article, it became quite clear it was a non-story. True, it was fact-based but it seemed to be a case of throwing half a dozen (somewhat unrelated) facts together to form a story

But then perhaps the actual content of the article was irrelevant. The headline 'Falklands Invasion Alert' is nothing if not catchy and it's the headline that sells the tabloid.

Just look at Tuesday's headline on the Express: 'Diana death: Police cannot rule out murder.

Hmm...

#### Councillors face busy June overseas

THREE councillors have a busy schedule of overseas meetings ahead of them next month.

Councillors John Birmingham and Stephen Luxton will represent the Falklands at the United Nations "C24" (Decolonisation Committee) in New York this year, arriving on June 11.

Preparatory work and lobbying meetings are usually held during the days leading up to the meeting which takes place on June 15. at which the 'Falklands question' will be debated.

A spokesperson from Gilbert House said that later in the week the pair will travel to Washington where meetings in the State Department are being arranged, "...as a follow-up from contacts made in 2004.

Councillor Birmingham will travel north via London and, before heading to New York, he will attend a Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA)/ Wilton Park/World Bank Institute Conference

This will take place from June 6-9 and the main theme will be "Promoting good governance and development in conflict-affected countries: the Role of Parliament and Government.

Councillor Birmingham will travel on to Canada after the C24 for three days, at the invitation of the Canadian CPA.

Councillor Luxton will combine his trip to New York with attendance at the American Association of Petroleum Geologists (AAPG) in Calgary.

Councillor Mike Summers will be in the UK for a Stanley Services Board meeting in early June. This coincides with his attendance at the CPA British Isles and Mediterranean 36th Regional Conference which this year takes place in Jersey, Channel Islands. He will be joined by the Clerk of Councils, Claudette Anderson.

The Gilbert House spokesperson said, as is customary when in London, the councillors, "...will take the opportunity to call in at Falkland House and to take part in any meetings."

The three Councillors, accompanied by London Representative Sukey Cameron, will meet the new Minister with responsibilities for the Overseas Territories, Lord Triesman, on June 10.

#### Express invasion alert story 'a hotchpotch'

A STORY published by the Sunday Express, claiming that British Forces in the Falklands have been put on high alert amid fears of a new invasion by Argentina, has puzzled Islanders and government officials

The "exclusive" story, which took up the paper's front page and two internal pages last weekend. claimed troop numbers in the Islands are being "increased from 3,000 to 5,000" as a response to "provocative Argentinian flights close to the 'no-fly' zone.'

The article also ties in the arrival of the patrol frigate HMS Portland as a "boost of strength."

Speaking to the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station on Monday, His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce, said he was "puzzled" by the article.

He said there is "absolutely no substance" in the story, adding, "It is, of course, common knowledge that the current Argentine Government has reduced the level of cooperation with the Falkland Islands but there is no reason at all

to believe that there is any increase in the threat to the Islands' secu-

"I can say, too, that there are no plans to increase the size of British Forces in the Falkland Islands and also that the current deployment of HMS Portland in the South Atlantic is entirely routine.

Mercopress correspondent Harold Briley reported on Sunday night that he had contacted a Ministry of Defence spokesman who ridiculed the claims, "describing them to me as rubbish."

Mr Briley described the article as, "...mainly a hotchpotch of old stories stitched together to present a scare picture which is not bome out by the facts."

Press in Argentina were also quick to rubbish the story; Clarin reported that the Argentine Foreign Ministry called the Sunday Express report "pure sensationalism" and stated that Argentina has promised to use only peaceful means in gaining sovereignty of the Falkland Islands.

#### Borders and Southern joins the AIM

OIL and gas exploration and production company Borders and Southern Petroleum has made its debut on the Alternative Investment Market (AIM).

The Company, which is chaired by Harry Dobson, has raised £9.1 million net of expenses, to fund an exploration programme to be carried out on its Falkland Islands acreage and allow it to assess and acquire interests in further international exploration projects which meet the Company's investment criteria.

Borders and Southern Petroleum holds five production licences by the Falkland Islands Government over its acreage southeast of the Islands.

#### PWD teams work on ice-free routes

THERE is a definite nip in the air and the Public Works Department (PWD) are making preparations for snow and ice prevention and clearance.

Roads Engineer Bob Hancox explained that financial and resource limitations prohibit the treatment of the entire network of roads so priority is given to maintaining safe driving conditions on those roads which are shown on the Stanley ice route map and key sections of the MPA road on days when interna-

tional flights occur. Rocksalt is applied to Stanley roads and the MPA road commencing at 6am and 5am respectively when frost or icy conditions are forecast. "The gritting routes are pre-determined, allowing safe access to most areas of town although circuitous routes may be required to some locations. Footpaths are not treated following the prediction of frosty conditions but consideration is given to them, particularly in the more heavily pedestrianised areas when prolonged freezing conditions or snow is experienced and sufficient resources are available.

Mr Hancox said weather forecasts are received on a regular basis from the meteorological office at Mount Pleasant "...this forms the basis of our decision making process with regards to gritting actions taken in the interests of road safety. Meteorology is not an exact science and it is inevitable that conditions materialise that cannot be predicted."

This can lead to difficulties in several ways. Rain is followed by rapidly clearing skies: the gritting operations cannot commence until the rain has stopped (to avoid the salt being washed away) and temperatures can fall quickly under clear

skies allowing the formation of ice before the salt is applied. Mr Hancox said it is "impossible to forecast with any accuracy," when "dawn frost" will occur, likewise when early morning dew on dry roads develops and freezes on impact with a cold road.

"When rain turns to snow, early salting cannot take place as the salt would be washed away.

"Our aim is to ensure that salt is spread on the roads before the formation of ice: to achieve this we have two teams on stand-by during the winter months. One team covers the MPA road with a purposemade gritter lorry, the other team covers Stanley roads using a tractor and gritting trailer. These gritters spread approximately 200 tons of rocksalt onto the roads during a typical winter. We also have numerous salt bins for the hand spreading of salt at strategic locations both in town and on the Camp road network

Financial and resource limitations dictate the numbers of salt bins and therefore each site is considered on its merits, Mr Hancox said.

During the winter months numerous requests are received by PWD from the general public and private businesses to provide them with rocksalt for their own use.

Mr Hancox said unfortunately PWD salt stock levels. "...do not cater for random supplies outside of our own operations and we therefore have a policy of not supplying rocksalt for personal use under normal circumstances. This ensures that we have sufficient salt stocks at all times allowing us to provide the most efficient service to the general public on public highways. It is however usually available from one or more local merchants."

The white paper states that the UK Government is committed to ensuring good government and sustainable political, economic and social development in the Overseas Territories and to guaranteeing their security and defence. "In return the UK Government expects high standards of probity, governance and adherence to the international agreements to which the UK and the Overseas Territories are a party; and expects to minimise the extent to which the UK is exposed to contingent liabilities."

Mr Pearce said in the Falkland Islands these principles work well: "There is close consultation between the UK and Falkland Islands Governments on relevant issues of foreign policy and international relations. Falkland Islanders run their internal affairs to a

very large degree.

"Thus, although the Constitution allows the Governor the power, subject to certain conditions, to overturn the recommendations of Executive Council, I have never once exercised that power during my two and a half years here, or even come close to doing so. This is in itself a tribute to the standards of decision-making and governance achieved in the

Islands."

However he added that, in addition to the provisions of the Constitution, the UK Government needs to be able to protect its position, particularly with regard to its international obligations, through the occasional inclusion in certain key pieces of legislation of powers enabling it to act through the Governor.

"Such powers are already provided for in certain items of Falklands legislation, although they have in practice rarely been exer-

cised, and are likely to be required from time to time in appropriate pieces of future legislation. But this does not in practice derogate from the principle that Falkland Islanders are responsible for run-

ning their own affairs.

"For its part, the UK Government fulfils its obligation to uphold the wishes of the Islanders, in particular by supporting them in their relations internationally, and to defend the Falklands through the presence of British Forces South Atlantic Islands, a responsibility which involves a substantial cost for the UK tax-

payer.
"I believe the partnership works well and, for most of the time, smoothly."

#### Positive cases of MRSA originate overseas

ONLY a small number of patients in Stanley have tested positive for the hospital superbug in recent years, however the health service "takes MRSA very seriously", the Chief Medical Officer has confirmed.

Dr Roger Diggle said three positive swabs for Methicillin Resistant Stapphylococcus Aureus (MRSA) have been taken this year and some sporadic cases have occurred over the last few years. "All the affected people have been treated according to our infection control policy and all have had the MRSA successfully eliminated."

All patients who have in-patient care overseas are isolated if they are admitted to the KEMH on their return to the Falklands until their MRSA status is confirmed. Dr Diggle said

"This process takes two to three days. If a patient is found to be MRSA positive then they are treated and all persons who have been in intimate contact with the

patient, including all relevant nursing and medical staff, are tested and treated if necessary. Patients who have been critically ill, had major surgery, are elderly or otherwise have reduced immunity are at higher risk of acquiring MRSA.

"If a patient has been positive for MRSA there is always the risk that it may reactivate and so these patients are always isolated on admission to KEMH until their current MRSA status is known."

Rooms are deep cleaned after an MRSA-positive patient has been in it. Dr Diggle confirmed staff are trained to wash their hands between dealing with each patient and all staff have their MRSA status tested on appointment and upon return from leave if they have been working in overseas hospitals.

Dr Diggle said there have been no instances of locally acquired MRSA: "All the cases we have had have all been in patients who have been treated overseas or in staff car-

ing for those patients.

#### SSA work to protect Islands' racing heritage

JUST nine months from the expiration of the lease on the racecourse committee members of the Stanley Sports Association (SSA) feel they have not made any progress in the last year towards securing the future of the racecourse.

The race course is on land leased from Falkland Islands Government (FIG) and the Falkland Islands Company Ltd (FIC) with the lease due to expire in February 2006

Owen Summers Chairman of the SSA. told the Association 's Annual General Meeting that although the Environmental Planning Officer had not been able to disclose any thing further about the planning of the area, he felt that SSA had the support of the Planning Office.

It was decided that the next step was for SSA to meet with Councillors to discuss the way forward at the earliest opportunity.

Keen jockey and committee member Arthur Tumer stressed that the sports, "...are part of our heritage," and as such need to be protected.

Also at the meeting on Wednesday it was decided the committee are to explore the options available for holding the traditional prizegiving dance in the evening of the final day of the three day event which takes place on December 26, 27 and 28, under a format which will not exclude children and the young jockeys.

What is the eligibility criteria for children to board at Stanley House and is there any requirement for children to have Falkand Island status.

Camp Education Supervisor, Richard Fogerty provided the following answer

A Falkland Islands legislation provides for all children of school age to receive education.

Stanley House provides accommodation for students over the age of nine years and living beyond reasonable travelling distance of Stanley

In terms of access, the Education Department cannot discriminate between children with Falkland Islands status and those without, except that the latter are charged substantially higher fees.

The Education Department has to reserve the right to exclude any students.

This could occur where it is felt that accommodation in Stanley House is not in the best interest of the individual student, the other residents, or where Stanley House might find itself legally vulnerable.

## **Court news**

#### Fined after two collisions in forklift

A FIJIAN man working with 460 Port Troop at Mare Harbour was banned from driving for a year and fined in the Magistrate's court on Wednesday after he pleaded guilty to a charge of drink driving.

The court heard that Apisaloma Nawaqabuli was operating a forklift truck at Mare Harbour on May 12 when a colleague saw him approach a shed with a boat engine on the forks. The engine collided with a pallet of bricks and fell off the forks.

Mr Nawaqabuli's colleague thought it was a mistake, however when a second collision took place causing another boat engine to fall from the forks he told Mr Nawaqabuli to report to the commanding officer. When he failed to do so the concerned colleague informed his commanding officer of the situation.

The Military Police were called to Mare Harbour where it was confirmed that Mr Nawaqabuli was under the influence of alcohol. A sample of breath taken at the Mount Pleasant police station

gave a reading of 50mg of alcohol per 100ml of breath (the legal limit is 35mg).

Justice of the Peace (JP) Mandy McLeod, sitting with JPs Andrew Brownlee and Judy Summers, told Mr Nawaqabuli that they were aware that he had not been drinking while working but was over the limit from the night before, "...a situation that has come to court before." Mrs McLeod said, "People do get away with it, but in your case it affected your work."

Mrs McLeod said a mandatory driving disqualification would be imposed for one year as well as a fine of £200 plus £70 prosecution costs.

Also in court was David Martin Crowie who entered no plea to a charge of assault occasioning actual bodily harm to Michelle Crowie on May 22.

Defence Lawyer Richard Marlor requested an adjournment so that he could take instruction from his client. Mr Crowie was released on bail to reappear in court on June 1.

#### Prime animals for viewing at Elephant Beach

EAST Falkland farmer Ben Berntsen is keen to show some of his prime stock in an effort to encourage other farmers to take part in the forthcoming Artificial Insemination and Embryo Transfer programmes.

Elephant Beach Farm Ltd is having an open day on Friday May 27, for anyone wishing to view some impressive half bred Dohne Merino Ram hoggets. Ben said some are from last year's AI programme while others are bred from Elephant Beach's own ET rams from the previous year.

With next year's programme on the horizon and the assistance of the Department of Agriculture's Pasture Improvement Plan (PIP) to help with funding for genetic improvement Elephant Beach Farm is willing to show these animals to anyone who may be interested in this breed.

### Children should be home in bed

WHEN adults are very drunk they sometimes fight, damage property, argue, urinate in public places and even jump naked into the freezing cold sea.

They would never act like this in other circumstances; they do it because they cannot control their actions following too much drink. It seems somewhat naïve therefore. as you suggest in your editorial (PN – May 20) to expect them to suddenly change this way of behaving, just because there are eleven and twelve year olds mingling with them on Friday and Saturday evenings near pubs in Stanley.

Eleven and twelve year olds are not young adults; they are children. You describe Stanley as a safe place. No. It is a relatively safe place but no town is safe, on those occasions when locals and strangers come together to take part in adult pastimes.

One day a child will be raped or will disappear or will be murdered. It happens all over the world and Stanley is not immune.

Of course the Government can

not pass a law saying that young children should not stand on street corners at midnight.

The staff of Stanley House act in loco parentis i.e. they are required to act as a reasonable and responsible parent would. Stanley House requires all its children, some of whom are as old as 16 years, to be indoors by 9.30pm; younger children aged 11 or 12 have to be in the hostel by 8.30pm.

So, what is the solution? Perhaps it's fairly straightforward. These young children need to feel safe, secure and free from molestation, bullying or threats. They also need to be safeguarded from the more extreme manifestations of drunken behaviour and the obscene language which sometimes goes with it.

Perhaps the police, rather than introducing laws, should just round up these young children, take them home and suggest they go to where they should have been about two hours previously – BED!

THE entire Department for International Development (DFID) team, which visited St Helena at the end of last month. was deeply grateful to all the many people who so generously gave their time and advice in the numerous discussions that were held both on the island and aboard the RMS St Helena.

I can confidently report that DFID is far better informed about different shades of opinion, particularly on air access and governance reform issues, as a result of the visit. Thank you very much everyone!

A long list of follow-up actions was agreed with our colleagues on the island. This will help us. amongst other things, to take forward preparation of the necessary pre-qualification process for short-listing international bids to take on a 'design, build and operate contract for the new airport Please be patient while this important 'foundation' work for the project is taking place. I promise you that, in consultation with your local Access Office, we will provide progress updates whenever there is something new that we are able to report

A number of people asked for clarification on a related issue. I can confirm that no deals have yet been struck with any tourism interests or other potential investor groups. Indeed, no deals will be made until after such time as St Helena Government, with our help, has finally decided on its approach to the kind of inward investment and tourism that will work and will suit the island and its community. Meanwhile, preliminary contact with potential investors is proceeding. All will be treated on an equal footing

A second point, which also arose during helpful public meetings and discussions through the island media, concerns the subject of next week's Consultative Poll. I can confirm that, in the event of a ministerial form of government being introduced. DFID would provide assistance with the transition process.

We would also consult with the St Helena Government to work out how best to cover any on-going additional costs, taking account of a planned process to streamline and modernise government. There would be no reduction in DFID support for public services.

This is a period of incredibly important change for St Helena. DFID looks forward to working closely with the island government and community to ensure it is change for the better and for the benefit of Saints.

#### Police safety reminder for cyclists

WITH the dark winter nights here. the Royal Falkland Islands Police would like to remind all cyclists that during the period between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, all cycles must show a white light to the front which is visible for a reasonable distance, and an un-obscured and effective red light or reflector showing to the rear.

All bicycles are required to have an audible warning device fit-

ted (bell or horn)

You are also reminded that any person in charge of a pedal cycle on a road must keep to the left, or near side of the road, when he meets traffic proceeding in the opposite direction and to the right. or off side of the road, when passing traffic proceeding in the same direction. You should not ride your cycle on a pavement or footway of a road or on a public jetty and you should not carry a person over the age of eight years on a road on a pedal cycle unless it is constructed or adapted for the carriage of more than one person

All cyclists should be aware that it is an offence to ride recklessly, ride without due care and attention, ride without reasonable consideration for other road users or ride your bicycle while unfit through drink or drugs.

The Royal Falkland Islands Police actively encourages safe cycling and recommend that all bicycle riders wear protective equipment such as helmets during normal cycling and reflective clothing when it is dark or visibility is poor.



as Runner Up.


Due to extensive renovations which have been carried out on the Town Hall in recent months and leading up to the Ball, some concern had existed as to whether the hall would be ready on the night.



### Young People's Participation - what is it all about?

IT IS important that children and young people get the opportunity to tell us whether we are getting things right or wrong in terms of

services for them.
Currently 54% of the work Social Services undertakes here in the Falkland Islands relates to children. young people and their families. The other 46% covers Probation, adult support and community care work

It is easy for adults to look back at their childhood with adult thoughts and knowledge.

Children and young people don't have the benefit of hindsight so find it hard to understand where we, as adults, are coming from sometimes.

A tecnager storming out of the room shouting You just don't understand' is telling us that we have forgotten what it is really like!

It is important therefore that we go back to basics and give our younger generation the opportunity to remind us what it is like.

The purpose of participation is to empower children and young people to enable them to have a say in how we deliver our service and to influence how our services

are developed.
The process of how we engage children and young people is just as important to what we do.

The Falkland Islands Social Services is committed to meeting this principle in its provision of services for children and young people and it is our aim to make our service more accessible to them.

So how do children and young people benefit from participating

The process of participation empowers children.

it gives them a voice

it enhances their life skills, self esteem and their education.

it gives them an opportunity to explore and develop their own values and beliefs.

it encourages children and young people to uphold their rights.

it influences services in the Falkland Islands

it lets them have a say in service provision and influence service development.

The UN Convention of the Rights of the Child Article 12 states the child has a right to their own views and a right to express those views freely in all matters affecting them and a right for their opinion to be taken into account.

Children's Rights is an interesting topic to explore as some adults find it quite worrisome. To reassure people participation and children rights is about supporting and lis-tening to the voices of children and young people rather than giving them all the power. It is a process whereby rights and responsibilities go hand in hand.

Children and young people are a diverse group of individuals with specific needs who have an assortment of different ideas, views and opinions. So how we capture these is important.

Social Services is at the early stages of developing a Young Pcoples Advisory Group and will be looking for young people to volunteer their services soon.

#### **PUBLIC NOTICE**

Following a number of complaints from Stanley Residents, the Royal Falkland Islands Police would like to remind dog owners of the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Ordinance 2000.

Section 2

(1) This Ordinance applies-(a) To any land within Stanley which is open to the air and to which the public are entitled or permitted to have access (including without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing, every road, footpath, road verge, car park, children's playground, recreation ground, pleasure ground. wood or other open space provided for public use or enjoyment). and

(b) Any land outside Stanley open to the air to which by order under this section it is declared to apply Section 3

(1) If a dog defecates at any time on land to which this Ordinance applies and a person who is in charge of the dog at that time fails to remove the faeces from the land forthwith, that person commits an offence unless-

(a) He has a reasonable excuse for failing to do so; or

(b) The owner, occupier or other person or authority having control of the land has consented (generally or specifically) to his failing to do which is "open to the air" if it is open to the air on at least one side.

(4) For the purposes of this section-

(a) A person who habitually has a dog in his possession shall be taken to be in charge of the dog at any time unless at that time some other person is in charge of the

(b) Placing the faeces in a receptacle on the land which is provided for the purpose, or for the disposal of waste, shall be a sufficient removal from the land; and

Being unaware of the defecation (whether by reason of not being in the vicinity or otherwise). or not having a device for or other suitable means of removing the faeces, shall not be a reasonable excuse for failing to remove the faeces.

If you are the owner or carer of a dog and are walking it within the boundary of Stanley and it defecates, you are required by law to remove the facces, please carry a poop-scoop or a plastic bag and use it to clean up after your dog. helping us to keep our streets

## Recipes for the Falkland Islands Moroccan Mutton Tagine (serves 5)

Ingredients

I tablespoon olive oil

2 large onions, peeled and sliced

2 pounds mutton, cut into 11/2 inch cubes

I teaspoon ground cumin

I teaspoon ground coriander seed

I teaspoon ground ginger

l teaspoon ground cinnamon salt to taste

I teaspoon ground black pepper 4 pears - peeled, cored and cut into

1/2 inch chunks

1/2 cup golden raisins

1/2 cup blanched slivered almonds

Heat the oil in a large pot over medium heat. Fry the onion in the oil until soft.

Add the meat to the pan, and fry until just browned on the outside.

Season with cumin, coriander,

ginger, cinnamon, salt and pepper. Pour just enough water into the

pot to cover the meat.

#### Baked Mushroom Rice (serves 5)

Ingredients

2 cups uncooked white rice 1 (10.75 ounce) can condensed

cream of mushroom soup I cup vegetable broth

½ cup chopped onion 1/4 cup fresh chopped mushrooms

I teaspoon dried parsley teaspoon dried oregano 1/4 cup butter, melted

salt and pepper to taste

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F (200 degrees C).

In a large bowl, stir together the white rice, cream of mushroom soup, and vegetable broth. Blend in the onion, mushrooms, parsley. oregano, melted butter, salt, and pepper. Transfer to a baking dish, and cover with a lid or aluminium

Bake for 35 to 40 minutes in the preheated oven.

If the rice is looking dry before it is tender, then pour in a little water and continue cooking until rice is tender.

GREASY wool prices increased substantially at sales in New Zealand. South Africa and Australia last week for lots in the micron range relevant to Falkland Islands farms
As shown in the below Micron

Price Guide" price increases were generally in the range of 3 to 7

pence per kilogram clean.

Consistent price increases have occurred over the last fe v weeks. As a result prices are now generally at their highest levels for several months. As an example 20, 22, 24. 26.28 and 30 micron fle ecc wool have all risen in value by 8 to 15 pence per kilogram cleans in ce early March, while 32 micron fleece wool has increased by 6 p/kg clear in the same period

Premium and discount rates for staple strength, wool sty le. staple length and vegetable matter contamination remained quite steady.

Low VM, better style skirting types attracted attention From buyers and as a result finished the week stronger in price.

In Australia 92% of the 58.024 bale offering was sold. In aluded in the offering were 4,029 bales of crossbred wool of which 95% was sold Good clearances we we also recorded in New Zealand and South Africa

Auctions continue next week in New Zealand and Austraulia. where approximately 65,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale

### Aerolineas flies the flag and cautions Lan Chile

"WE expect Lan Chile to be fully committed to Argentina and not consider the country as simply another market," cautioned cautioned Aerolineas Argentinas Chief Executive Officer Antonio Mata who drastically marked the competing rules for the incoming airline during an interview with the Buenos Aires press.

Playing the nationalistic chord. Mr Mata warned that Lan Chile is not necessarily committed to the country where it has operations, and said to keep in mind "...they refer to the Malvinas as the Falkland Islands.

The difference between them (Lan Chile) and us is the commitment to the country, we consider Argentina our homeland, for them it's another market; but we expect them to adapt Argentina and comply with the social role (non profitable lines) they must play," un-derlined Mr Mata.

However Mr Mata admitted that the presence of Lan Chile in Argentina, beginning in June, is good for competition and for the commercial air industry.

"We want Lan Chile to come but flying to all destinations, contracting Argentine staff, paying Argentine taxes and showing the social commitment we have with the " said Mr Mata adding that Lan will fill a vacuum left by other companies in the Argentine domestic market.

We're not concerned with Lan's competition, it's good for travellers and for us, even when air fares are regulated by the government. But we believe that given their turnover and expectations they will need several good years before they achieve their goals."

Mr Mata also warned that there is quite a distance between targets and reality and, "we're not going to remain put - we'll see if they can reach them. They could lose so much money that their shares could collapse and with the aircrafts they are planning to bring. I doubt they can achieve goals unless they also carry passengers on the wings

Mr Mata talked of the "feeling" with which companies make business in a country as is the case with Aerolineas, "...55 years at the service of Argentina.

"If we had planned not to serve Argentina we would have only concentrated in the most profitable lines, and this is important at the moment of making decisions. Aerolineas results and taxes remain in Argentina, Lan Chile's go to

Chile; it's obvious associates transfer their earnings to headquarters. When your objective is making the most out of a market, there's no commitment to the country," highlighted Mr Mata.

As part of Aerolineas' commit-ment with Argentina, Mr Mata announced that beginning in July they will be flying twice weekly to Beijing and Shanghai, via Madrid, with extensions to Tokyo and Bangkok further in the near future. "We plan to take advantage of the growing business traffic with the Far East and the incipient tourist current to Argentina: we want to bring in Chinese tourists.

Mr Mata also mentioned the investment of 200 million US dollars in twelve four/five star hotels in Argentina's best tourism spots, out of Buenos Aires, which will enable the Argentine flag carrier to promote full travel and hotel packages.

Finally Mr Mata talked about the Aerolineas Peru project, a ten million dollar operation with Peruvian investors with the objective of making it the official Peruvian flag carrier. Having an associate in Peru is part of Aerolineas regional strategy to compete in all markets against Lan Chile, Latinamerica's most profitable airline

#### Compensation for Andes tragedy

THE Chilean Army has said it will compensate families with 10,000 S dollars for each of the soldiers killed when a company marching in the Andes was exposed to a sudden, fierce blizzard last week.

The death toll on Monday stood at 26 with 19 still missing but presumed dead.

In spite of heavy snow and winds Army rescue patrols with the help of helicopters continued the round the clock search. Patrols have concentrated in an area near the dormant Antuco volcano, east of the city of Los Angeles, where the tragedy occurred.

Army Commander in Chile, General Juan Emilio Cheyre, in announcing the compensation, also said each family would receive a lifetime monthly pension equivalent to 450 US dollars

With the exception of a sergeant whose body was found on Sunday, all the deceased are 18 and 19 year old voluntary conscripts

Relatives are accusing Chilean Army's officers of disregarding weather forecasts and allegedly abandoning the ill-equipped soldiers in the Andes slopes.

The soldiers loss of life has also triggered a national debate in Chile on the draft

## Gibraltar takes on Argentina

### Leader of the Opposition stands up for the Falklands at the UN

GIBRALTAR'S Opposition Leader has spoken out in defence of the Falkland Islands at a United Nations Seminar on decolonisation.

Before addressing the meeting on issues relating to Gibraltar, Joe Bossano made a "robust rebuttal" of a call from the Argentine delegation for the seminar to adopt a recommendation that Falkland Islanders do not have the right of self-determination.

Argentina's argument was that decolonisation of the Falklands was a matter of territorial integrity and its people had been transplanted to the Islands illegally by the "occupying power".

Mr Bossano, who visited the Islands in 1992, called this "utter rubbish".

He said Argentina was trying, "...no less than to alter the Charter of the UN...which says that all peoples have a right to self-determination and, by virtue of that right, they freely determine their political status and freely pursue their economic, social and cultural development."

Mr Bossano picked holes in Argentina's argument about the "oc-

cupying power"

"What I would like to know is which was the occupying power that provided the honourable gentleman with his genetic code because he does not look like an Aztec or an Inca to me.

"What we have in South

America, in Argentina where he comes from are the people of the occupying power eventually rebelling against their mother country, Spain, and decolonising. By his criteria they would not be entitled to that right."

entitled to that right."

He continued, "As if that were not enough, the honourable member presents himself before this seminar and produces self serving arguments by deliberately selectively quoting from the UN established documents list.

"The UN has never said that the people of Gibraltar or the people of the Falkland Islands don't have the right to self determination because there is somebody that wants the place in which they live, and they have been living there in the case of the Falkland Islands only since 1833 and in the case of Gibraltar only since 1704. That is utter and complete nonsense."

The Falkland Islands were not represented at the seminar and Mr Bossano told the meeting it would be a "travesty and indeed a democratic deficit" to consider Argentina's argument "when the Falkland Islanders are not here to put the contrary case for themselves."

He urged the gathering to "totally ignore the suggestions and recommendations from the distinguished delegate from Argentina."

The motion proposed by Argentina was not carried and the

resolution was not included, only 'noted'.

On Tuesday, Falklands councillors wrote to Mr Bossano to thank him for his "robust rebuttal" and for his support.

Councillor Roger Edwards said he thought Mr Bossano's speech was "excellent."

"The Argentine delegate was trying to put an amendment in, Joe stood up and gave a very firm rebuttal and they didn't even vote on it"

He said the move by Argentina was "not totally unexpected - it's what they are always likely to do."

He added. "It was a shame that the Foreign and Commonwealth Office or ourselves didn't have someone there looking out for us.

"We must in future make a marker to try harder to get to that meeting."

Councillor Edwards said that councillors do not often attend the UN Seminar - a precursor to the New York C24 meeting in June - as it clashes with the annual budget session. However he added, "I think the future council should revisit that decition."

He said this episode "highlights once again" the need for the Falk-lands to have representation overseas. "... or you can lose out by default"

"We are very lucky to have strong support from Gibraltar."

## Man jailed for attacking wife

A STANLEY man has been jailed for six weeks following a "severe" attack on his wife.

In court on Wednesday, David Martin Crowie pleaded guilty to a charge of assault occasioning actual bodily harm.

He admitted hitting his wife on the morning of May 22, after a conversation about their troubled relationship.

In a statement to police, Mrs Crowie said that "out of the blue" the defendant told her. "you think you are so macho," then hit her. She said he pinned her down and hit her around eight times with the full force of his fist.

A medical report presented to the court - which included photographs of Mrs Crowie's injuries stated that her cuts and bruises were consistent with multiple punches.

Defence lawyer Richard Marlor said his client was not a violent man but that a "red mist" had descended upon him when Mrs Crowie "bluntly" admitted a one-night affair.

On the telephone the night before the attack, Mrs Crowie had hinted to her husband that she had been with another man, in revenge for Mr Crowie's having committed adultery with her sister.

Mr Crowie held a previous conviction of assault in 2000 against a former girlfriend.

Mr Marlor said the attack on Mrs Crowie can be viewed as an isolated incident, he added there had been "provocation in both incidents."

He said Mr Crowie was sorry for his actions: "..it happened and he can't take it back, though he wishes he could." He added that Mr and Mrs Crowie are attempting a reconciliation.

In sentencing, Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said it was undoubtedly a "severe" attack, with the blows to Mrs Crowie's head being "potentially quite dangerous."

Mrs Faulds said she did not accept that the incident in 2000 should be viewed separately and that this was a "repeated incident of violance".

She said Mr Crowie's six week sentence could be considered a "cooling off period," and may present an opportunity for the couple to work through their difficulties.

Mr Crowie was ordered to pay £70 prosecution costs.

We are so caught up in our own little townie world most of us are ignorant to the anguish with which people are trying to hold on to their

lives in Camp.

And yet they remain the most hospitable people in the country. The majority needs to take a leaf from the minority's book.

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#### Inspector praises schools' progress

ALL three areas of the Education Department have been praised for their progress in the latest

inspection report

Director of Education, Sylvia Cole, told the Board of Education on Tuesday that she was "delighted" with the results of the inspection. adding. "Camp Education has particularly come on in leaps and bounds

Mr Richard Cheetham visited the Infant and Junior School. Community School and Camp Education in March and the executive summary of his report has been made public At the Infant and Junior School.

Mr Cheetham says, there has been good improvement since the previous inspection
"Pupils' attainment is slightly

higher and their achievement better than at the previous inspection

"The quality of teaching and learning is good. Its overall quality has improved since the previous inspection because there are no unsatisfactory lessons, and there is a greater proportion of those that are good or better. Two lessons were of the highest quality."

Mr Cheetham praises the headteacher. Mr John Farrow, who .. continues to lead the school well and with senior staff and increasingly with others, manages the school effectively.

"This is an improvement since the previous inspection when management was satisfactory.

The Falkland Islands Community School has also made good progress since the previous inspection, Mr Cheetham says.

"The overall quality of teaching and learning has improved since the previous inspection and remains sat-isfactory. There are fewer lessons that are unsatisfactory and more that are good or better.

"There are teaching strengths throughout the school but some weaknesses are common to a minority of lessons.

Of the school's management, he says, "The headteacher now leads the school well and manages it soundly with the support of the three senior teachers.

Keeping up with Stanley, Camp Education also comes in for a level of praise from Mr Chcetham who says the department has made good improvement since the previous inspection.

"Most pupils make satisfactory progress from their significantly different starting points. Attainment by Year 6 is broadly average, achievement is satisfactory but there

is little higher attainment "
He says the quality of teaching and learning has improved since the previous inspection and most lessons now have "good features".

"This is because staff have

worked hard to develop the curriculum and have introduced a number of measures to improve the consistency of their work

It is also because new staff have joined the service and brought with them personal and professional qualities that the service management is using well.

Mr Cheetham says the quality of leadership and management has improved. "... and is now satisfactory in most respects and good in some

Before the inspections began, Mr Cheetham says, he read a letter in Penguin News that outlined the Framework for the Office for Standards in Education (OFSTED) Inspections of the type he leads in English schools. This, he says, may have "inadvertently raised false expectations of my inspection work in the Falkland Island schools and Camp Education". He uses his report to clarify matters

The inspections in 2002 and the current ones are not OFSTED inspections as in English schools Were they so, I would have a team of Inspectors and significantly more inspector days at my disposal. However, they do share several of the

same characteristics

"The Falkland Island inspections are led by an OFSTED Registered Inspector and are based on selections from the OFSTED Framework for Inspection. They use OFSTED criteria to ensure consistency and rigour of inspection judgements. The inspection methodology is that used by OFSTED inspectors and I adhere to the OFSTED Code of Conduct. In addition to my inspectorial duties, I have provided advice to the schools and to Camp Education.

Mr Cheetham says his aim was to, "...inspect the schools and Camp Education objectively and provide impartial reports, based on strong evidence and give balanced judgements to support further improve-

FALKLAND Oil and Gas Limited (FOGL) has announced the placing of a number of ordinary shares to raise £10 million

The money will be used to help conduct further seismic surveys in its offshore licenced areas.

The company announced on Tuesday that 11.764,706 ordinary shares of 0.002p (New Ordinary Shares) have been placed at a pirce of 85p per share, raising approximately £9,700,000 after expenses.

FÓGL also announced its entrance into a 2D seismic contract with Geophysical Services Incorporated to acquire a minimum 8,000km of 2D seismic with an option for the company to extend the survey, subject to agreement between FOGL and Hardman ReThe programme is scheduled to cover areas in both the 2002 and 2004 licence areas and will concentrate on areas of interest identified in the initial 9.450km survey which has just been completed.

The new 2D seismic programme will use the GSI Admiral and is expected to commence this

Also announced this week was that drilling in the Islands is going well for Falkland Gold and Miner-

At the company's Annual General Meeting, Chariman Richard Linnel said, "Following an initial period of heavy investment in plant, machinery and operational infrastructure, the Company is well placed to increase drilling productivity in the coming months.'

### Court news

#### Disappointment at lack of trial date

A DATE for the trial of Cherilyn Julie King who has pleaded not guilty to charges of assault occasioning actual bodily harm and common assault has still to be determined.

Due to the fact that Ms King is currently employed as Court Administrator it has been necessary for the services of a magistrate from outside the Islands to be sought.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said that a name has been put before His Excellency the Governor and approved in principal and that trial dates in August or September were being looked at.

Ms King's bail was extended until August 3, when she will reappear in court.

Crown Prosecution Ros Cheek said that she had expressed disappointment a month ago at the lack of progress with the case, saying that as it is a domestic violence case there is a strain on all involved.

Ms Cheek said that in the UK such matters are fast tracked to three months after the hearing; she added that this matter will have been ongoing for nine months by the time of the trial. She said she would like it acknowledged that the prosecution has done everything it can to proceed with the case.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds explained that most of the candidates that the court would turn to for assistance are people who have formerly worked in the Falklands and as such have a conflict of interest where Ms King is concerned or knowledge of her family. She said exceptional steps have been taken to find someone to deal with the case. Mrs Faulds stressed that no exception has been made in the procedures because of Ms King's connection with the court.

Also in court on Wednesday an application to remove a disqualification from driving was refused.

James Colin Green from Mount Pleasant was banned from driving on October 6, 2004 for one year.


Mr Green said if he was able to

IS IT correct that the May Ball has an age limit of 15 and over? If so, what happened this year? I saw a parent with an infant at the Ball - is the age limit filtering off?

Group Scout Leader of the First Falkland Islands Scout Group, Phil Middleton, provided the following answer

A The questioner is correct that the age limit for entry to the May Ball is 15 and over, as it has been for many years.

This year the secretary to the Falkland Island Scout Association, made her customary visit to the event early in the proceedings to deliver the prizes, ensure that the sash and tiaras had arrived safely. and bring along her plate of do-nated food for the refreshment room. Accompanying her was her new born infant securely fastened in a papoose. After satisfying herself that all her duties had been carried out, a quick look into the hall to experience some of the unique atmosphere was enough, as other more important feeding duties required a swift exit

Hopefully the question was asked in the spirit of "tongue in cheek", and should this be so, the parent concerned would be happy to explain the situation direct to the questioner. From an organisers' view it does highlight the fact that at least twenty individuals give considerable time making the May Ball happen. These include the people seen on the night, but it also includes many others who voluntarily take on tasks throughout the preceeding weeks. All are encouraged to attend and enjoy the culmination of their efforts.

Should the questioner like to assist in next year's May Ball, I would be delighted if they contacted me, or the secretary.

WHY is the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) renting the old abattoir and at what cost?

Operations Manager, John Ferguson provided this response
A FIMCo is renting the old butchery from the Falkland Islands Company Ltd (FIC) for several months, purely for the storage of salted and palletised sheepskins from the 2005 Export Season.

FIMCo does not currently have sufficient warehousing for the number of sheepskins produced during an export season, which have to be held for a minimum of 60 days after baling. It is planned that all the salted skins (amounting to almost 22,000) will be exported in July.

FIMCo is planning a storage facility at Sand Bay for the storage of salt and skins.

DOES the latest proposed increase in postal rates mean a proportional increase in efficiency to Post Office customers, for example incoming mail will no longer get "stuck" at Mount Pleasant for a further day?

Postmaster Moira Eccles provided this answer.

A The increases to mail post cards and letters by air were considered by councillors as part of the budget process.

The underlying reasons for the increases fall into the category of "User Pays Policy". Falklands outgoing airmail contains a greater number of individual items per kilo than the world average and external charges for handling and routing have increased accordingly. No increases were proposed for local or surface rates and postage for packages containing merchandise reduced last year.

The charge for mailing items from the Islands has no impact on the cost of service provision in relation to incoming airmail.

Normally the majority of incoming airmail is received in the Stanley Post Office within hours of arrival in the Islands.

Mail volumes have increased and Customs have at times been unable to carry all mail to Stanley on the day it arrives. Any remaining mail is collected by Customs after they have dealt with the outgoing plane next morning.

The mail residue is normally received and processed in time for collection during the lunch-hour.

Airmail is therefore generally available for collection within 24 hours of arrival in the Islands.

Customs have recently received a larger vehicle to enable them to transport more mail on the day it arrives. It is anticipated however that some mail will still require collection the following day as it would be inefficient to have officers (Customs and Postal) waiting around until the military have opened all airmail from the plane.

The services are generally finished by 11am, after which refreshments will be available in the Community Hall at Fitzroy.

It was a sad day when the owner of Frescho felt they had to close their doors. Frescho must have been the first for a long time that put a lot of money back in the

farmers' pockets without any help in setting up the Frescho business or any help along the way - very easy on the taxpayers pocket.

So, now the abattoir will buy farmers' beef but we will be paid less and the farmers have to get the animals to Sand Bay. I am sure anyone who has worked with animals knows even tame animals get all stressed out and bang into each other causing bruising.

But I guess every cloud has a silver lining for someone; as the farmer gets less, the consumer should also be paying less for their meat

I was very disappointed to hear the Governor say in his address to the nation, that he knew people in the community were not comfortable with the Argentine Families Commission visiting in March. I do not think you will find many Islanders who object to genuine grieving families coming to see where their loved ones are buried and they have been coming here for years.

I think what a lot of people did not approve of was that if the Governor felt he should entertain the families why not do it at another venue in Stanley, but not using the Islanders Government House. It just did not seem right with Argentina still claiming the Falklands. If they drop their claim on us, things could be different, but it is us who seem to have to do all the giving.

On the budget, it was good that Education and Health Services stay the same. For the farming community old age pensions going up each year means now we have to find £1040 each.

Vehicle tax is going up and the freight on FIGAS - if you do not have a scheduled call, it is 30p on fresh produce - 10p if the plane is calling your way.

#### Extra bales not shipped

OVER the last year we had made it clear to the Department of Agriculture and the Rural Business Association that due to high charter and fuel costs we could only economically supply a third shipment if there were over 2000 bales to go

bales to go.

We also had to estimate the total amount of wool for this year from previous years figures. Based on these figures we accepted bookings from Falkland Landholdings and others keeping an eye on the total number of bales that were in the warehouse by tallying the bookings made for our vessel.

Shortly before the vessel arrived we were advised that a considerable number of extra bales had been deposited in the DSL section of the warehouse - these had not been booked with our office. We made the difficult decision to send the wool that we had accepted bookings for as we felt to ship wool we had not been notified of in preference to bales that had been booked in a proper manner was unfair on the many farmers that had made the effort to keep us informed. If we had space we would have taken those bales but the ship was not able to take any more wool.

We understand farmers have been able to send wool on the MoD service or to Chile and we will be taking steps to ensure that the situation of wool missing shipment to the UK will be resolved in future.

As in the past, as a company we have been prepared to offer farms assistance through extended credit should they be caught in such a situation and the writer has been contacted on this subject.

### Racecourse: urgent action needed

The following letter was sent to the Environmental Planning Officer on May 26.

NIGHT is drawing in fast on the expiry of the lease (February 2006) on land used by the Stanley Sports Association. It is time for urgent action to proceed in identifying suitable building plots to exchange for the acreage occupied by the SSA racecourse since 1910 or thereabout.

The recent water logging problem experienced was in fact created by Government through poor planning in the development of the Brewster housing north and south of Jeremy Moore Avenue. The building of roads and the hard track between the south row of houses and the racecourse, without adequate drainage was in effect a double row of dams, blocking off the natural drainage routes of water shed down hill to the harbour.

The sports run by SSA on Boxing Day and December 27 or at other times are an integral part of our heritage and should be pro-

tected to the full.

In 1982, after the war, many people rallied around to repair the shell damage, remove the ammunition from bunkers and fill in sangars. Support came from the Jockey Clubs in UK. The replacement Tote Hut was a gift from Chester Racecourse, put in place by the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers

. The Ministry of Defence recognised the importance of this facility and pulled out the stops to assist in repair in many ways from waiving freight charges to spare labour from the Forces stationed on

the islands.

Racing enthusiasts in UK, Chile

and the USA follow our Christmas Races with keen interest.

One tourist I transported to Bluff Cove Lagoon was very disappointed to learn he had missed our race meeting by two weeks and requested I post him a Race Programme. This I duly did, along with one from the Darwin Harbour Sports Association with results filled in.

In his letter of thanks he says - "What a Treasure! The SSA and DHSA race cards take proud place on my bookshelf alongside Race cards in my collection, including. '2 Arc D Triumph', 'Epsom Derby' and 'Melbourne Cup' along with my extensive American collection'.

## Sticky goo on MPA road a 'nightmare'

(Penguin News. Friday, May 20 2005 - page 9). The Director of Public Works must drive on a different road to the one I travelled on May 21 to Blue Beach and back to Stanley and today, May 29, 2005 to Goose Green 2 Para Hill for the Remembrance Service, returning to Stanley early afternoon.

In my opinion the Port Harriet quarry produces "mud stone" which contains a high proportion of clay. When first used on the road Browning farm cattle grid to Sappers Hill, I am told the material was crushed at Pony's Pass Quarry and washed to remove the clay. This process proved slow and expensive so was stopped.

The camber does allow rain water to run off faster, leaching clay out. The long ruts visible down hill near the Bluff Cove Lagoon turn off supports this theory. The sticky goo near Bluff Cove is a nightmare to drivers, likewise the mini cliffs (some 18" deep) along the edges of the narrowed road.

It is always a relief to reach the MPA junction onto the Darwin

Road where a safer, cleaner driving surface of black tillite is welcomed. This road was built by PSA with material dug out of Canada Ronda quarry with some from quarries east of Swan Inlet.

Black or black/grey tillite is in abundance in open quarries from Frying Pan west to Split Ridge, MPA/Darwin road junction, Comoda Ditch and Canada Ronda.

Over the winter the crushing equipment should be re-located to one of the above sites.

The advantage black tillite has over other materials is that it breaks down by weathering, continually releasing smaller particles from the surface to make a solid base.

I have sympathy for the drivers of heavy goods vehicles, tankers and those who have to use the road on a daily basis. For safe driving PWD should provide a number of drive through car/Land Rover/truck wash facilities. The present atrocious road surface advocates taking shares in Bonner's Jet Wash. Eric M Goss

## Liberation parade clarified

ON BEHALF of the Parades Working Group I would like to clarify the small changes that have been made to the Liberation Day Parade, and also to explain some of the background behind the changes.

As most readers will know the Liberation Day Parade on 14th June each year commemorates the liberation of the Falkland Islands from Argentine occupation in 1982 - undoubtedly the most important military event in the history of the Falkland Islands.

The Falkland Islands celebrated the 20th Anniversary of Liberation with a large parade on June 14, 2002. During this special parade the Freedom of the Falkland Islands was conferred on all HM Forces serving in the Falkland Islands and Falkland Islands waters.

Prior to 2002 the armed forces presence at the parade was restricted to representative wreath layers, formed up on the road facing the monument, sentries, and a small detachment from each of the services and the FIDF who would stand on the east side of the monument and witness the Service of Remembrance.

In response to general comments that the format prior to 2002 was too low key for such an important event, it was decided to introduce some enhancements in 2003.

The event was altered to include armed detachments from the Royal Navy. Army, Royal Air Force and Falkland Islands Defence Force formed up on the road in parade formation in front of the monument in order to pay appropriate respects to HE the Governor, Commander British Forces, and to those who fell during the 1982 campaign. Wreath layers representing the Services and civilian organizations and individuals formed up on either side of the monument prior to laying their wreaths during the service.

The Working Group has now considered the format of the event still further, and has decided that it would be more appropriate for the wreath layers to be assembled facing the monument prior to the placing of wreaths. The revised format for the ceremony at the

Liberation Monument is as follows:

At 1045 the sentries will take up their positions resting on arms reversed at the corners of the Liberation Monument. Shortly afterwards the marching detachments will arrive and take position on the seaward side of Ross Road, facing the Monument.

Wreath layers will take up their initial positions on the east and west sides of the monument and will be joined by their wreath bearers (the bearers will be members

of the Brownies).

At 1058 CBFSAI will arrive (received by a general salute), followed by HE the Governor at 1100. Following the royal salute HE the Governor and CBFSAI both turn about to face the Monument. This will be the signal for those laying wreaths and their wreath bearers to move onto the road in front of the Parade troops and form up facing the Monument. The Service will then commence and will be followed by the Last Post, two minute silence and Reveille.

Following Reveille wreath laying will start. As each wreath is placed the wreath layers will go back to their original positions on the East and West sides of the Monument, and the wreath bearers will revert to their Youth Group stations. The Blessing follows wreath laying, and HE the Governor and CBFSAI will then turn around to receive a Royal Salute from the Parade troops. The Parade will then march off, turn and march past, giving a salute to the monument in acknowledgement of the sacrifice that it symbolizes.

There will be a "walk through" rehearsal for Youth Group Leaders and wreath layers at 1115 on Monday, June 13.

The Working Group for 14th June Parade, consisting of the Clerk of Councils, the Hon. Mike Summers, Civil/Military Liaison Officer, SAMA Chairman, OC FIDF and FSM FIDF look forward to seeing as many spectators as possible at the Service and Parade on June 14.

## Legislative Council meeting coverage:

## Mining Bill: Executive Council will decide licencing before Secretary of State

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL has approved the Mining Bill, which repeals and replaces the Mining Ordinance, first enacted shortly after the First World War

The Attorney General, Mr David Lang, extensively summarised the Bill at last week's meeting of Legislative Council.

He said, as is the case with the present Ordinance, the Bill only relates to minerals owned by the Crown in the Falkland Islands. It would not extend to offshore minerals, nor would it extend to minerals in private ownership.

Mr Lang explained that, as is the case under the existing law, a licence will generally be required by any person who wishes to prospect for, explore for, or mine any mineral be-longing to the Crown. "There is a minor exception to this, not appearing in the existing law, in relation to fossicking activities and a more important exception that the owner or occupier of any land who wishes for the purpose only of using the same on his own land to mine, quarry or take stone. flint, gravel, sand or calcified seaweed. That reflects an exemption in the present Ordinance which is somewhat extended."

In general a person wishing to undertake mining activities will also need planning permission under the Planning Ordinance. "Where a li-cence is required by the Bill." Mr Lang said, "in some cases the consent of the Secretary of State would be required to the grant of a licence.

That should be contrasted with the position under the present Ordinance where in all cases the consent of the Secretary of State is re-The Foreign and Commonwealth Office have agreed that such a stringent requirement shall not apply where the five criteria set out in clause 11(3) of the Bill are satisfied."

Mr Lang told Legislative Council that every licence granted will be required to contain the model clauses which must be laid down by regulations unless they are specifically excluded by the licence. "In considering the grant of a licence, the Crown will be required to refuse

to permit any activity which would have an unacceptable degree of environmental impact. That will be something for Executive Council to consider - whether the activities had an unacceptable degree of environmental impact or not.

'Importantly the Crown would be required - meaning Executive Council would be required - so far as possible, to secure economic and other benefits to the residents of the Falkland Islands as a result of the activity permitted. say, in addition to the revenue which the Council might expect to receive by virtue of the grant of the licence.

"The grant of licences will be a matter for the Governor after consultation with the Executive Council but applications for licences will be made to the Director of Mineral Resources.

A major defect of the existing law, Mr Lang said. is its omission of any satisfactory provisions requiring compensation to be paid to the owner or occupier of land on which mining operations take place "This Bill forbids any mining operation to take place until the licensee has paid or tendered to the owner and occupier of the land the amount of compensation, if any, that the licensee is required to pay under and in accordance with the provisions of the Bill or until the licensee has made an agreement with the owner and occupier as to the amount, times and mode of the payment of the compensation.

"While no compensation is payable for minimum impact activity (a phrase defined in clause two of the Bill) it will be required in relation to more intrusive mining activities, including of course extraction of minerals. It is a principle of the Bill, reflected in its provisions. that wherever possible the licensee and the owners and occupiers of land affected will negotiate an agreement in relation to access and ancillary rights required by the licen-

Mr Lang recognised the possibility that agreement might not be reached. "In that event, the licensee could make an application to the Director for a declaration to be made by the Governor (that is to say, on the advice of Executive Council) that the making of a compulsory rights order would be in the public interest. However the Governor cannot reach a decision on such an application without considering in Executive Council any written representations he might receive from the owner or occupier of the land affected."

If the Governor is advised by Executive Council that a compulsory rights order would be in the public interest, Mr Lang said, the Governor must under clause 44(5) refer the matter to the Legislative Coun-"Only if the Legislative Council agrees that the making of a compulsory rights order would be in the public interest could the Governor proceed to make a declaration.

If a declaration were made, Mr Lang explained, every owner and occupier of the land affected would have a right to petition the Supreme Court for an order that no declaration should be made.

Then, only if the Supreme Court had dismissed the petition, could the declaration be made.

"When and if a declaration were made, the question of the compensation to be paid to the owners and occupiers would automatically be referred for determination to the Magistrate's Court. There are detailed provisions in clauses 53 to 61 of the Bill in relation to compensation. There is an appeal under clause 62 of the Bill against the decision of the Magistrate's Court.

Mining activities raise health and safety considerations and, Mr Lang for that reason clause 71 of the Bill enables provisions of the Health and Safety at Work Etc Act 1974 and regulations made under that Act to be applied by Order. "It also enables an agreement or arrangement to be entered into with the Health and Safety Executive UK in relation to health and safety supervision and advice in relation to mining activities." Similar provision is contained in the Offshore Minerals Ordinance in relation to health and safety matters

Environmental concerns will be dealt with in two ways. "The first is under the Planning Ordinance as proposed to be amended by the Plan-ning (Amendment) Bill..." (See page

"The second is by applying the provisions of the Environmental Protection Act 1990 of the UK by Order made by the Governor - with advice from Executive Council - under section 73 of the Bill and enabling the Falkland Islands Government to enter into an agreement or arrangement with the Environment Agency of the United Kingdom."

Councillor Norma Edwards asked Mr Lang to clarify the time scale in which any injury to the land must be "made good" following the cessation of mining activity. Mr Lang responded, "It would be my intention that an abandonment of mining activities for anything but a very temporary period would trigger the restoration provisions of the mining licence. I imagine similar care would be taken in the grant of planning permission...

Councillor Mike Summers made two observations on the matter.

The compulsory rights orders so far as they apply to this Bill are somewhat analogous to compulsory purchase legislation. The reason The reason that, in discussion of this Bill, Legislative Councillors requested that it should be the Legislative Council that has the final say on compulsory rights orders is the same thinking as took place when there were proposals before this House some while ago to introduce compulsory purchase legislation which was in fact declined by the house.

'It will be the Legislative Council in all instances who will make this decision.

Councillor Summers said some members of the public "might wonder" why there is a key role for the Secretary of State in the legislation. "It is because there are clear international obligations on the United Kingdom - and international implications for the United Kingdom in the extraction of valuable minerals from the Falklands. After lengthy discussion and much debate councillors have been persuaded that the Secretary of State should have a role in terms of the allocation of mining licences because of those obligations, be they international politics or environmental obligations that the UK has.

He continued, "The role the Secretary of State has in that respect is reactive, it is the Executive Council who first decides that a licence should be issued and then the Secretary of State is required to give his permission. It doesn't work the

other way round.

Councillor Summers then asked the Attorney General if the legislation is in any way retrospective and if it applies to any mining exploratory activities which are currently being carried out

Mr Lang said the legislation does not apply to the exploratory activities which are going on, "...where there is a valid licence under the existing Ordinance, the provisions of which will be saved under the provisions of the Bill if enacted.

However, he added, "A new licence will be required under the Ordinance if the present licensees or any successor of theirs seek to proceed to extraction activities.

"They were told long ago, at the time they applied for their prospecting licence, that an extraction licence would not be provided under the present Ordinance because it did not give what the government considered satisfactory control of mining operations, in particular it contained next to nothing in relation to environmental protection or health and safety considerations, or any satisfactory power to enable restoration to take place.

"That has been a trigger for the preparation of this Bill, so that the government would have satisfactory powers and would ensure a satisfactory mining regime being in place if - and it is if - the present licensees under the exploratory licence desire and wish to proceed to extrac-

tion operations.

#### **Employment Protection adopted for civil servants**

A BILL which allows civil servants to benefit from the Employment Protection Ordinance has been passed by Legislative Council.

The Bill repealed the provision of the existing ordinance, which excluded public officers from the provisions of the Employment Protection Ordinance 1988

Explaining the Bill last week, the Attorney General told Legislative Council, "It would replicate the provisions in respect of United Kingdom civil servants in that public officers here would continue to hold office during Her Majesty's pleasure as is required by Section 76 of the Constitution.

"They would not be entitled statutorily to minimum periods of notice. However, Honourable Members will know that the Management Code makes provision for

periods of notice for public officers. The Bill would exclude officers employed under a fixed term contract from access to the redundancy provisions of the 1988 Ordinance and unfair dismissal provisions of that ordinance merely by virtue of the end of their contract period. Otherwise, they would be entitled to claim unfair dismissal under certain circumstances or to claim redundancy.

"It would make provision in respect of compensation awards to encourage the use of internal appeals procedures before application to the Court. In other words, the Court can take into account that internal appeal procedures had not been used when deciding on the amount of compensation, which should be paid to an officer for unfair dismissal."

## Government Bills passed on May 27

## Sexual Offences legislation adopted

A BILL which adapts the provisions of the UK's Sexual Offences Act 2003 to the Falkland Islands has been passed.

The effect of the Bill, the Attorney General said, would not be to change the law but to make "adaptations to the law which are necessary in local circumstances."

The Sexual Offences Act 2003 completely revised the former UK law on sexual offences, including the former law in the Falkland Islands on sexual offences, which Mr Lang said had been described as "archaic, incoherent and discriminatory."

tory."

The Bill was introduced in the UK following extensive consultation. Mr Lang explained. "Part one creates a new framework of sexual offences, setting out new categories of offences involving abuse of trust, care workers and people trafficking, among others.

"It introduces new laws as to the presumptions regarding the law of consent which had caused difficulty for example defendants in sex cases could raise as defence that they believed the victim had consented."

He added, "The law is reformed by the Act, casting an evidential burden of proof on the defendant in circumstances where it is most unlikely that consent was in fact given freely by the complainant - an example of that is where the complainant was unconscious or asleep."

The protection of children was one of the primary objectives of the 2003 Act and therefore offences against children are a major part of its provisions, Mr Lang said.

Children under the age of 13 are not, under the 2003 Act, of age to give consent to any form of sexual activity.

Developments in technology and the internet are also dealt with and, for the first time under the 2003 Act, child grooming with a view to committing sex offences is a specific offence.

a specific offence.

Mr Lang said, "The Act extends many existing offences and will encompass far reaching situations. For example, it is recognised that the majority of child abuse takes place within the family and sections 25 to 27 of the 2003 Act redefines family relationships to encompass anyone living in the same household as a child and assuming a position of trust or authority.

"That is whether the person living in the household is a relative or not; if he is living in the same household, he is regarded as being in a position of trust or authority."

## Radio station set to move from government

THE passing of amendments to the Media Trust Ordinance, which will allow the radio station to be independent of government, provoked a discussion on impartial election coverage at Legislative Council's meeting.

The Bill allowed for the necessary amendments to be made to the Media Trust Ordinance required for the proposed transfer of the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station from government to the Media Trust.

Councillor Mike Summers addressed the Bill. He said the move of the radio station away from the government is an action that this council has had as an aspiration for quite some time. "...because we want to avoid the perception - not perhaps the reality - that the government in some way can control this important part of the media.

"It is after all the only civilian radio station in the Falklands which deals routinely with civil matters."

Mr Summers said that while there has been "no evidence whatsoever of political interference or interference by officials, as far as I know, in the activities of the radio station, so far as editorial content is concerned," it is important to avoid the perception.

He asked the Attorney General what "protections of process" there might be during "periods of elections or other periods of public consultation" to ensure that "absolute fairness or equality as amongst differing points of view or differing can-

didates can be provided under this piece of legislation."

Mr Lang replied that under Section 5 (1) of the present Ordinance, there is an obligation under the Trust, "...to require that due impartiality is preserved on the part of persons providing the programmes in relation to any matter which for any reason is likely to be controversial.

"Further, that a sufficient amount of broadcasting time is provided free of charge impartially between candidates at times of Legislative Council and other elections and elections to public bodies in the Falkland Islands."

Mr Lang said there are also provisions in the Bill requiring independence from any political party. "...and general provisions ensuring the newspaper and broadcasting station are informative of news and current affairs within the Falkland Islands."

He added, "I well appreciate, however, the concerns that the Honourable Member has expressed and if it is felt that the obligations of the Media Trust are not sufficiently set out in the Bill and need filling in as to how it is envisaged that those will be fulfilled, then I could suggest perhaps that a memorandum of understanding should be entered into between the Falkland Islands Government and the Media Trust, dealing with those matters."

Councillor Summers said it was an important issue adding, "I hope the Executive Council will consider this matter in due course,"

## Pension Scheme: two Bills approved

TWO Bills have been passed to amend the Falkland Islands Pension Scheme Ordinance of 1997.

The principle amendments of the first, the Attorney General explained, are concerned with the benefits which are payable to Government Employee Members of the Pension Scheme with an employment start date after December 31, 1996, "...including re-joiners who become permanently incapacitated through ill health or disablement and have to retire before they reach normal retirement age.

"As amended by Clause 5 of the Bill, the incapacitated member will be able to choose to receive certain pension benefits as from the time of such early retirement."

Other minor amendments to the 1997 Ordinance are also made in the Bill and the reasons for all the amendments are covered in the Explanatory Memorandum to the Bill

Mr Lang said the opportunity has been taken in Clause 7 to amend Section 31 of the 1997 Ordinance, "...so as to improve the position of dependence of Government Employee Members who die after retirement."

At present, he explained, the dependants payments only come into force if there is no surviving spouse. "The Amendment will change this so that dependants pensions will come into force upon the death of a Member, even if the Member leaves a surviving spouse. This follows UK Best Practice."

He added, "Please note that the

He added, "Please note that the main provisions do not apply to private sector employers and their employees, who are free to make their own arrangements for early retirement benefits under Section 29 of the 1997 Ordinance as amended by Clause 6 of the Bill."

The second Bill amending the Pension Scheme allows for compulsory contributions to be made by Government Employee Members.

Mr Lang explained, "At present

Mr Lang explained, "At present pension arrangements for Government Employees are non-contributory, although they may make additional contributions. The Bill proposes to change the situation so that all new pension of Government Employees will have to make contributions to the pension scheme of 5% of basic salary. Minor and consequential amendments to the legislation are also included in the Bill."

## Permit applicants' main residence must be here

A PERMANENT Resident Permit will not be granted to a person unless they can show their principle home will be in the Falkland Islands.

This was one of the amendments made to the Immigration Ordinance by Legislative Council last week.

According to the Attorney General, this provision makes it clear to people applying for permanent residence that they could have another home outside the Falkland Islands, "...provided he or she intended that his or her principle home, if he or she were granted a permit, would be here."

The second amendment made by the Bill presented last week was the insertion of a new section which enables the government, if there were need for any reason, for example financial or economic circumstances of the Falkland Islands, to suspend for the time being the issue of Permanent Residence Permits. Mr Lang stated that, "..there has been no decision taken to bring any such suspension into effect at the present time, nor has government considered that it is necessary to do so."

Councillor Mike Summers seconded the Bill and asked the Attorney General to clarify whether the suspension on the issuing of permanent residence permits could only be made due to financial circumstances. Mr Lang explained: "...if the Governor considers that circumstances have arisen or may arise within the next 12 months in which it is not or may not be in the interests of the Falkland Islands for the time being that any further Permanent Residents Permits shall be issued, he may by order under this subsection, suspend the operation of Section 18. It is Section 18, which authorises the grant of Permanent Residence Permits."

He said he used the example of financial circumstances as they were "the most obvious ones." He added, "There are others; for example, there could be a natural disaster, which had caused the disruption of a great number of homes in the Falkland Islands and, until those homes had been replaced, it might not be in the interests of the Falkland Islands for the time being that any permanent Residence Permits shall be granted.

"Those are not the only circumstances and nor does the Bill seek to limit the circumstances in which it might be in the public interest to suspend the issue of Permanent Residence Permits."

Mr Lang also confirmed the Governor's considerations are made with advice of Executive Council.

## Law changed to allow youngsters to shoot

YOUNG people will have greater opportunity to work on their target practice, following an amendment to the Firearms and Ammunition Ordinance.

Previously, any member (aged over twelve years) of a youth organisation approved by the Chief Police Officer (CPO) could use a firearm in the presence and under the supervision of an officer of such an

organisation for target practice at a place approved by the CPO.

Legislative Council approved a Bill to allow the category of approved organisations to be widened. Mr Lang explained, "In other words it would not be limited to a youth organisation but could include the Falkland Islands Defence Force, the Rifle Club and any other responsible organisation approved by the CPO."

Councillor Ian Hansen, attending his second budgetary session, had a light hearted view of the proceedings saying that as, with every budget, there will have been decisions made that will have annoved people, decisions that will please people and decisions that people really don't care about either way, adding, "...in this context I guess we will have achieved a balanced

Councillor Stephen Luxton said he felt it was a fairly successful budget. even better than he could have thought possible following another bad illex fishery.

Councillor Mike Summers commented, "I'm not sure we can be happy about producing a deficit budget even though it is only about £400,000, but I think we have done remarkably well and when I say we I mean the folk in the Treasury.

He continued, "Illex is a key issue in the budget. A decision was made when considering the level of refunds. to take the view that illex is a continuing resource and the budget this year is set down on the view that illex is a continuing resource, albeit with some peaks and troughs."

Councillor Summers said, whatever happens with the bio-mass of illex in the next two to three years, it is not a foregone conclusion that licenses will be sold in the same numbers or at the same prices as in the past, so in future hudget rounds, more efforts to decrease government expenditure can be antici-

"The main issue with the budget is being fair and equitable to everybody. in both distribution and collection. He said they had also tried to concentrate as much as possible on investments in the future, "...that is what you have to do in a vibrant economy and we do have a vibrant economy; a reduction in government expenditure does not indicate a poor economy, it's an indication of a reduced government income, that's all."

Councillor Summers said investments will continue to be made in the

LEGISLATIVE Councillors are future of agriculture, tourism, fisheries, minerals, general development through FIDC, education and looking after the population through health and social services. He added, "...it's a good way to think of investment and makes everyone feel better.

Councillor Summers concluded that this was a good opportunity for Islanders to demonstrate their "supreme ability" to be adaptable, in the situation of having a little less money.

Councillor Birmingham said one of the successes of the budget for him was that service levels in health and education have not been hit, and that the majority would accept the budget as a good one considering all the pressures on the public purse "It has been a compromise between what we would have liked to have done and what we are able to do

Councillor Birmingham thanked his colleagues for their support of the tourist industry " so that it may have a real opportunity to grow and prosper if everyone decides they can work to-

Reserves have not had to take the hit that councillors expected. Councillor Cheek commented during her speech, due to an increase in taxation and. "better performance of some of our investments.

"However, we cannot rely on the same every year so great care must be kept not to let costs escalate.

She congratulated all the departments who have worked to keep costs down, make the required savings and still kept services running.

All councillors paid tribute to the Financial Secretary Derek Howatt his deputy Keith Padgett and the rest of the team at the Treasury for their hard work leading up to the budget.

Councillor Richard Cockwell also paid tribute to Heads of Department who had been called upon to make budget savings.

He added that while savings should be urged wherever possible, "...we have to try not to depress employment, especially in the private sector. This is something that would really start us down a slippery slope."

## Tribute to those who 'rarely get a mention'

He said he would like to thank them for their work as they move around on a daily basis, "...and no one seems to take any notice '

In particular he mentioned Lois Cottage on John Street which he said a year ago was in a "tumbledown state" but is now looking pristine and is a fine example of what can be done.

Councillor Cheek said an, "...unsung" department is that of Human Resources (HR) who have huge responsibilities in terms of overseeing staff and recruitment and dealing with the innumerable staff problems as they arise, "they are unsung and mainly invisible but incredibly important."

She said FIGO are presently working under strength due to illness but have maintained their usual high stand-

## Privacy and dignity for hospital's permanent residents

COUNCILLOR Norma Edwards said she was glad to hear the ward for the elderly will finally be ready next year.

THE Commander of British Forces in the Falkland Islands, Air Commodore Richard Lacey has again praised the efforts of the Falkland Islands Defence

In his speech to the motion for adjournment, Air Commodore Lacey complemented FIDF saying he had had the pleasure of observing them at close quarters as well as the, "...troublesome task of trying to keep them out of my complex during exercises, and have been extremely impressed with all that they do.

He added. "I believe that the FIDF is a clear signal from Falkland Islanders that they wish to play a significant role in providing their own defence. The quality of what they do is outstanding, the number of people who remain in the defence force for long periods far exceeds anything that the reserve forces in the UK can expect and the commitment is unlike anything else I have seen elsewhere.

'I have always been hugely impressed by them and long may they continue

Air Commodore Lacey thanked councillors for their generous wishes for his future and for the gift of a Legislative Council tie which he said he would wear "with pride".

He said he felt privileged to have sat on Executive and Legislative Councils and to learn of the issues that are faced by councillors. He added, "I am

impressed with the work Honourable Members do on behalf of the community here and I think the community is extremely well served. I feel my participation has helped me to undertake my job rather better."

I will however reflect your comments to my successor and perhaps it will change again for next year.

"We hope all parents will enforce good discipline in the home and teach their children right from wrong and we must also do it in the formal education processes.

I worry immensely about the way in which teachers in the UK have been emasculated in what they are now allowed to do and it worries me that if we carry on along that road here, and prevent our teachers from exercising the necessary discipline in schools that we too could see ourselves in an unforHe added. "I don't wish to be

gloomy about these things, but I do hope that in this small community we have enough vision and wisdom to understand that letting kids do exactly what they want, any time they want. isn't exactly a great way forward and it didn't save any society anywhere."

Councillor Birmingham said he too was concerned at the level of hooliganism around town and the level of litter dropping that takes place as well as the amount of smoking in small roups that takes place on Allardyce Street prior to going to school and at lunch time. "We don't seem to be able to do anything about it as it is outside the school grounds and therefore has nothing to do with the Education Depariment

He said the DARE project works very well but as children become teenagers they need to try things out, ". certain areas I can understand that but as adults we can't turn a blind eve."

Councillor Birmingham said that he had spoken to some of the young smokers but asked if those in author ity could occasionally take the time to travel along the route used by the chil-

## Luxton: 'high fuel prices are hitting our farmers'

COUNCILLOR Luxton has used his Legislative Council speech to have a bit of a grizzle" about fuel prices.

He said fuel accounted for a substantial part of the increase in the cost of living over the last year, partly due to increased oil and transport prices.

Councillor Luxton said however. that he is not convinced that this justifies petrol having almost doubled in price in a short period of time with diesel having increased by approximately 25% in the same period. He added, "I assume the diesel increase reflects the effect of the inflated oil

Councillor Luxton said he wished to see "something more substantial put in the public domain" to explain "how it is that the other costs have increased by such a large amount, and more intportantly whether the supplier is making active efforts to investigate alternative means of supply that may be more cost effective."

He commented. "It is not just a handful of people this affects, it affects almost every single farm in the Falklands who rely on petrol for motor bikes and four wheelers to make a living and they are probably the ones least able to afford such an increase at this time

Councillor Norma Edwards had similar feelings on the subject saying, It is a constant mystery to me. have looked at the fuel formula loads of times and think that maybe it would be a good idea, and we would understand better, if there was a simpler formula to follow

"Maybe Stanley Services could look again at the way they work out the price of fuel, because it is very complicated and hard to justify to people on the street when they ask you why fuel has gone up to such an ex-

## West councillors support road programme

WEST Falkland Councillors Ian Hansen and Norma Edwards were both supportive of the continuing road building programme.

Councillor Hansen said he was pleased that the road programme was to be continued in its entirety; he said, as it is so near completion. "it would have been foolish to have even slowed down progress," and added, "it is money

Councillor Edwards said it had to be borne in mind that once the roads had been built they had to be maintained, adding, "...when times are hard road building is an ideal way to keep a large number of people employed rather than on the dole.

"We originally said that we wanted high maintenance low cost roads - or tracks as they were referred to initially - and that is what we have got. The gangs that have been beavering away around the Islands have done a tremendous job for us."

## Planning to begin for replacement of FIPASS

MONEY has been approved to plan for the replacement of Stanley's port,

In his speech to the motion for the adjournment, Councillor Richard Cockwell said he was pleased the approval had been made. "We have to recognise that FIPASS has a finite life,

it keeps on getting extended by five years, but sooner or later there will be a five years where it isn't there any

"So it is necessary to start this process and I look forward to seeing how this comes about."

## Questions for oral answer

## Plans to accommodate extra school children

are being drawn up by the Education Department to accommodate the extra children in future.

Responding to a question from Councillor John Birmingham, Councillor Jan Cheek said the Camp Education Supervisor and Headteachers at the Infant/Junior School and the Falkland Islands Community School have already spent time addressing this issue.

She said, "Camp Education would welcome an increase in birth rate in the Camp, within their current capacities at the settlement schools and considering the Travelling Teacher resource, such an increase could be accommodated unless the locations were so diverse that Travelling Teacher hours were overstretched

The Infant and Junior School has considered the increase in numbers as part of planning for the future, Councillor Cheek explained. In the 2005-06 academic year, the two present Preschool groups will enter Reception as one group. In that year, Years 3 and 5 will be single-class year proups As a result of this there is flexibil-

ity. In the future, two-class year groups can be accommodated without any problem until the 2008-2009 academic year. This would cater for all children not vet in school, and also, those yet to be born in the coming two years."

She continued. "In 2009-2010, should there be no additional accommodation forthcoming and if every year group has two classes, then music would be taught in the hall, as it was until three years ago.'

The biggest challenge, Councillor Cheek said, lies in the present accommodation at the Community School (FICS). "FICS was designed for twoform entry but because of cuts made by the council of the day, it was built with four classrooms less than the original design. The existing school

WITH the increasing birth rate, plans has, it is recognised, about 50% 'wasted' space, although the atrium is aesthetically pleasing and adds to the openness of the school

Mrs Cheek said FICS is short of classroom space and recently the Information Communication Technology (ICT) room was divided to create extra teaching space. "Without this space, FICS could not offer its existing timetable, at the same time as accommodating those pupils who are required, by law, to stay on at school for an additional term between September and December. That is something that will gradually be phased She continued, "Any increase in

student numbers would need to be accommodated in the existing two-form entry classes. Any increase to three-form entry would have significant accommodation and staffing implications. Existing tutor groups have approximately 2 x 20 students in each year. "In most areas of the school expansion would be possible by restructuring the space in the rooms. with modifications to storage space and the addition of extra furniture. This would include the rooms used for History, Geography, ICT, Maths, English, Art and Spanish. In a number of rooms more extensive alterations would be required.

She concluded, "It is, therefore. not impossible to provide extra space but there would be costs attached Numbers of pupils at the Community School have increased from 160 to 180 in the past three years. The key fact here is that FICS does not have all the classrooms which were in the original plan and the pressure on space is increasing with the numbers." A final point to bear in mind is, that an increase in the birth rate could result in an increase in children with special educational needs and in the number of pupils wishing to study overseas. all of which carry extra costs.

## Reindeer moving south to Albemarle

which relocated to West Lagoons Farm last year are to move to Albemarle.

Councillor Mike Summers was asked for a progress update on the reindeer, imported to the Falklands in February 2001, by Councillor John Birmingham. Councillor Summers said 59 reindeer arrived in the Islands in 2001 following capture and transportation from South Georgia. They were taken to the Department of Agriculture's quarantine unit at Saladero and comprised 26 females and 33 males. By August 2001 the herd numbers had reduced to 41 (15 females and 26 males).

Mr Summers said the herd was first mated in 2003 and in November of that year the first fawns were born; 11 fawns, 6 female and 5 male were produced bringing the total herd to 51. In the summers of 2003 and 2004 the veterinary officers castrated a number of male animals. Councillor Summers told Legislative Council, "In 2004 the Falkland Islands Development Board agreed a recommendation to privatise the management of the National Reindeer Herd and to sell some of the castrated animals for venison or tourism purposes."

Expressions of interest from farm-

HALF the reindeer breeding herd ers were sought and the Board accepted bids from two farms on West Falkland to manage the herd.

The terms of the agreement reouire farmers to maintain a core breeding herd that remains in FIG ownership while excess progeny revert to the farmer." The breeding herd was shipped to West Lagoons Farm on West Falkland in August 2004 and has remained in the care of the farm owner for the first year. Twenty-one castrated males were tendered separately in 2004. Three were sold as venison in Stanley while the remaining deer were bought for tourism or venison purposes.

Councillor Summers reported, The breeding herd has adapted to its home at West Lagoons and 12 more fawns were born in November 2004. The Veterinary Officer visited the herd on May 17 to sex. tag, weigh, castrate and remove antlers. "To date the breeding herd comprises of 37 rein-

Half the breeding herd is expected to be transported to Albemarle Farm before the end of the winter. Councillor Summers told LegCo, "The Department of Agriculture will continue to monitor the progress of the two herds and mark and tag the stock each year.



## It shouldn't happen to a groom - a column for horse lovers

Falkland Islander Lisa Johnston lives in Cyprus with her BFBS radio presenter husband Steve and son Jacob (12). Here she tells us of her life and laughs at RAF Akrotiri's Saddle Club.

SHAMPOOING ponies might not be everyone's idea of a good time. but there's a certain satisfaction in watching a scruffy little welsh cob metamorphose into a kick-arse

fancy show pony.

If you're wondering where I'm going with this, I can confirm that some of my formerly hair-raisingly, hopeless little pupils have completely dumbfounded me by doing OK at a Cypriot horse show.

'Dumbfounded' because when

'Dumbfounded' because when I made the nervous decision to drag them, and our best-behaved ponies, along to Curium Equestrian Centre, I was convinced we'd be spending more time running around the arena chasing a freedom-crazed black cob than collecting rosettes.

With that thought in mind, my colleague and I decided to scrub the ponies until they shone, so that at least while leaping around the ring knocking over stewards and fences, they'd look extremely attractive in the process.

Following that I sat my pupils down and gave a long and desperate speech about 'it's the taking part that matters'; 'good experience'; 'the sand at Curium is very soft' and 'if Legacy chucks you off, for God's sake keep hold of his reins.'

Of course it was hopeless. They gazed back at me with dreamy smiles that epitomised the conviction they'd all be coming home with armfuls of medals. Needless to say I didn't sleep that night.

Still the day started well. At 6.30am all of the ponies loaded beautifully into the Saddle Club's massive and archaic horse-box. De-

spite a dangerous lean to the right, and a creaking 1970's gear box, my heroic husband nursed the useless heap of junk to the show ground, and deservedly (and smirking modestly) received a round of applause from a group of jodhpurclad Cypriot girls as it bunnyhopped up the gravel drive.

If that hopeful start weren't surprising enough, the organisers, complete with white breeches and cute pony tails (and that's just the blokes) simply smiled good-humouredly when I made a billion changes to our entries, and then enquired if it was all right if the instructors screamed instructions from the side. (As in "turn left Megan, turn left, TURN LEFT... OH DEAR GOD NOOOO...")

The first class went well, with the two youngest girls popping over the tiny cross poles as if they'd been doing it for years – even little Sophie who has the concentration span of a cornflake.

The next class (50 cm upright

jumps) produced rather more excitement. *Bella* a sparky old ponyridden by my friend's daughter, galloped the entire arena, missed most of the jumps and then efficiently plonked her sobbing rider at her mother's feet.

However Akrotiri was back in the running with our next competitors, one completing a fabulous clear round at uncontrolled gallop (I'd ordered her to stay in trot) and another managing to finish brilliantly, while sitting on her pony's neck. We all happily agreed it was an image fit for a Thellwell cartoon.

What with the sun, the beautiful setting, - next to a beach - no hospital visits and six little medals for six hysterically excited girls it was pretty much a triumph of a day.

But please don't be fooled into thinking that managing a saddle club is a bed of roses. After all it's common knowledge that if you give a bunch of English women even a sniff of a horse, they'll transform from a relatively civilised gaggle, into a group of power crazed, paranoid, whip wielding maniacs.

Happily I've so far been able to avoid being sucked into the Cypriot boiling pot of dressage crazed, wild women, not least because I still find it difficult not to simply view horses as rather lovely creatures bred to plod behind a few thousand sheep.

Thus, as a fairly neutral party in the horse wars of Akrotiri, my role as manager translates more closely to Referee /Peace Keeper than Manager of Horses.

But that I can handle. After all, having spent eight years psyching myself up each Friday to brave the glowering of those I've infuriated with a *Penguin News* editorial, dealing with a few hard-hatted harridans is a walk in the park.

What I do find difficult though, is the unrealistic expectations the title Club Manager brings with it.

Only a few days after inheriting the title, a horse owner approached me and demanded, "My horse has a cough, what do you think's the problem with him."

Now correct me if I'm wrong, but even a fully qualified vet with 25 years experience specialising entirely in horses' coughs would be hard pushed to come up with a diagnosis based on that symptom.

When I suggested we give the horse 24 hours or so (in case the poor animal was simply suffering the effects of sand inhalation after a gale) and then consult the vet, she replied "oh no... he charges for call out".

Aaaah, well in that case I'll just pop into the barn and get my mobile Xray machine and my veterinary bag and we'll have him sorted in a jiffy.

Sigh....

## LegCo Bills: Planning Amendment clears way for Mining Bill

A BILL described by the Attorney General as one which needed to be in place before the Mining Bill could be commenced, was passed by Legislative Council at its meeting

on Wednesday.

The Planning (Amendment) Bill was described by David Lang as "an important Bill" as, "...it contains provisions as to assessment of environmental effects and improvement of breaches of planning control are, in my view, essential if onshore mining activities on a commercial scale are to take place." He added, "I do not believe that the Mining Bill could be commenced without the provisions of this present Bill being in place."

Mr Lang said that a consulta-

Mr Lang said that a consultation exercise was undertaken by the former Environmental Planning Officer in relation to the contents of the Bill and he reported to the Planning and Building Committee in April last year that no formal comments had been received.

Mr Lang summarised the purposes of the Bill:

so as to clarify certain of its provisions

so as to insert in the existing Ordinance provisions replacing those at present appearing in the Highway Building Lines Ordinance and to repeal that Ordinance

so as to make new provision in relation to the assessment of environmental affects and environmental impact statements

so as to enable certain applications for planning permission to be dealt with by the Planning Officer

so as to amend and strengthen the provisions of the 1991 Ordinance in relation to breaches of planning control

so as to incorporate in local law recommendations made by the English Law Commission as to the improvement and clarification of planning law.

Responding to the Bill, Councillor Mike Summers addressed the part of the explanatory memorandum which dealt with the removal of existing buildings and structures. He said "I would be extremely unhappy to find, shortly after (the

Bill's) introduction, citizens were being hounded, harassed, encouraged for making relatively minor amendments to structures on their properties."

He asked for reassurance that amendments required in future be made "with dispatch" and that "those responsible for judging what should and what should not be subject to a development order should be given suitable guidance."

The Attorney General said he took Mr Summers point in relation to demolition; he said he would suggest that the provisions of the Bill be looked at in relation to demolition requiring planning consent.

"In other words to exempt a whole lot of minor operations...before provisions of the Bill requiring planning permission are brought into effect. That will have the effect that the other provisions of the Bill can be brought into force and, if necessary, that one can be delayed until a satisfactory situation has been reached."

Councillor Summers also asked the Attorney General to explain the extent the new legislation applies to existing mining or aquaculture operations.

Mr Lang said, "The existing operations have, so far as they require under the existing law, the grant of planning consent. The Bill would make no difference to the law, so far as it requires planning consent for mining operations. As to the future, they will have to make planning application for anything which constitutes development within the meaning of the Planning Ordinance.

"That would have to be made in accordance with the new provisions of the Planning Ordinance, which aren't altered in any material particular.

"But they will find, I think, that provisions as to environmental impact assessments, and environmental impact generally, which are stronger than those in the present Ordinance and, of course, they will need to bear those in mind when making application for planning consent."

## News from Executive Council's two May meetings

## New policy for government housing Fisheries Bill out for consultation

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL has considered an aspect of housing policy concerning the treatment of applications for government accommodation from property owners and ex-property owners.

Now, property owners who find themselves requiring accommoda-tion as a result of a relationship breakdown will be treated as follows:

 Where the breakdown of a relationship was the only reason for the sale of a house, either or both parties to the relationship could apply for government housing without having to wait one year from the date of sale;

• Where, following the

breakdown of a relationship, an individual signed a separation agreement or other document in which they agreed that eventually they would have no legal interest in the former home, and was not resident in the home, they could apply for government housing even if their name remained on the title to the former home in the meantime (eg to guarantee mortgage payments or pending sale).

## Off-street parking grants wind down

THE off-street parking grants scheme is to end.

Nearly five years ago, in October 2000, Executive Council approved the scheme to provide grants for off-street parking in Stanley. The scheme was subsequently amended in 2002 and confined to a core area' of central Stanley.

Since the scheme was established, a substantial number of grants has been made and a total of £25,203.69 has been spent.

However, the Governor reported, the rate of applications for

grants under the scheme has in recent times dropped sharply and ExCo concluded that, taking into account the current budgetary situation, the scheme had come to the end of its useful life.

"It was therefore agreed that the scheme should be brought to an end with effect from July 1, 2005, and the current budget provision reduced to £2,500 to meet commitments already agreed since July 1, 2003. Commitments made before that date would be deemed to be time

#### Funds aid memorial to merchant seamen killed in 1982

A DONATION of £1,500 is to be made towards a memorial to the Merchant Navy

An approach was made to Councillors by the Merchant Navy Falk-lands 82 Memorial Trust, who requested support for the establishment of a small memorial to the merchant seamen who lost their lives in the Falklands conflict, to be located alongside the main memorial on Tower Hill in London to merchant seamen who lost their lives in the two World Wars.

TWO meetings of Executive Council took place last week, primarily to deal with matters connected with the annual budget session of Legislative Council.

However a number of other issues were also discussed, including the latest version of the longawaited Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Bill.

His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce, said the text of this long and complex Bill has now

been agreed with the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

"ExCo agreed that it should be published for public consultation. before remission in due course to Legislative Council, and the text of the Bill will therefore be printed in the Gazette at the end of this month.

 Penguin News will include further information on the Fishcries Bill next week.

## Agencies work together to help nursery

A COMPROMISE has been sought on planning conditions for Stanley's proposed new nursery.

The conditions refer to Stanley Kids Zone's application for planning permission for a change of use of 3 Jersey Road to a day care facil-The nursery had appealed against certain conditions attached by the Planning and Building Committee to the granting of planning permission.

Governor explained, The

"These concerned arrangements for staff parking and for the delivery and collection of children from the site."

Following the appeal, Mr Pearce said, there have been further discussions between Stanley Kids Zone. the Director of Public Works and the Environmental Planning Of-ficer, "...as a result of which a compromise solution has been reached.

ExCo endorsed the proposals now agreed between the parties.

## Sewage disposal scheme to stretch over financial years

THE scheme for new sewage disposal arrangements on Ross Road has been discussed by ExCo.

The scheme is to reduce the level of discharge of untreated sewage into Stanley Harbour, by collecting the discharge from two of the major out-falls on Ross Road and transferring it through the pumping main already serving East Stanley to the Rookery Bay outfall. The

Governor reported.

"Detailed work on the scheme has shown that the initial estimate for the cost of this work was optimistic. The revised overall estimated cost is now £880,000. ExCo agreed that the project should nevertheless proceed, that phase 1 of the scheme should be carried out in the financial year 2005/06 (at an estimated cost of £350,000), and that phase 2 should be placed in the capital programme for 2006/07, at a cost of £530,000."

## Finding the time to get fit

WHAT do you find time for in your life? Responses to this question often fall into two categories: those things that are fun and enjoyable, and those that are priorities.

This article looks at ways to make sure that getting fit falls into both.

Enjoyable activities

Most of us can find time to watch a favourite TV programme or listen to a piece of music by a band or musician we admire. But for many, exercise isn't perceived as being fun. Here are a few ideas you may want to consider to make exercising more enjoyable.

\*Exercise with a friend at a pace at which you can still talk to each

other

\*Be active to music

\*Choose to exercise in a place you enjoy like the beach.

\*Exercise in clothes that make you feel good and in which you are comfortable.

\*Vary your activity so you

don't get bored.
\*Try something that helps you find "the child within", such as flying a kite or using a microscooter.

From the health perspective, the important thing is that you're moving, your heart is pumping blood at a slightly increased rate and you're using up calories to power your muscles. Choose activities you WANT to do, not those you think you should do: there's more chance you'll find time for them.

Life's priorities

All of us have priorities that form the 'have-to-do' list in our lives. These might include caring for someone, attending school, full time employment. Sometimes these become more than just priorities and take up all our time, leaving little space for leisure and recreation.

However, as you are most likely aware, there is a growing body of research that shows that physical activity is an essential part of a balanced and healthy lifestyle.

To achieve health benefits, it is recommended that people take 30 minutes moderate physical activity (for example brisk walking), 3 to 5 days per week. That's 1-2% of the total time in a seven - day week. For a priority such as improving your health, it represents an excellent investment of time and effort.

How to find time

Most of us claim there just aren't enough hours in the day to do all we want, including getting regular exercise. Is this really true? How can we find a few extra minutes in order to get more active?
The Early Bird

The most obvious way to find more time in your day is to get up earlier. Set your alarm clock half an hour earlier and use the extra time to go for a walk or swim at the Leisure Centre.

If you're not an early bird consider how you might use some time in the evening to increase your activity. You might want to buy some home exercise equipment so you can workout while watching television or listening to radio.

Time management tips

Here are some ideas on how you can get more active more often.

Make an appointment to exercise - and write it in your diary. Extend this by making a real appointment with a friend or work colleague or relative to exercise together. If you use your computer on a daily basis, set up a reminder message

Keep some exercise kit handy in places you spend most of your time. This might mean leaving clothes at work, with a relative or in the boot of your car. The point is, by having some kit handy you can take the unexpected opportunity to get some extra exercise.

Practice saying no to people who ask you to do things that aren't your responsibility, or don't even need doing. Protect your valuable time so you can use it for physical activity.

4. If you own a car, leave it at home as much as possible. Walk to the shops for small items.

5. If you work, make sure you take all your holiday entitlement. Consider taking active holidays such as a ski trip, horse riding, cycling or trekking.

6. Another way to find time to exercise is to build it into the natural rhythm of your day. Depending on your LIFESTYLE, you might want to consider the following ideas.

If you're working

Walk to and from work. If you live too far away park further from your office.

Use your lunch break. Arrange a game of squash.

Talk to your employers about promoting health at work.

If you look after children

Having children can change everything about your lifestyle. Some parents find their activity levels drop and their weight increases as the change prevents their previous involvement in team sports. Some positive steps you can take;

Exercise with your child. Take them to the swimming pool, play in the garden or go to the play-

ground or beach.

Share childminding with friends so you can take it in turns to attend a gym session or netball etc.

Telephone someone you met at antenatal classes or baby clinic and arrange to go for a walk (pram push) together.

Walk your child to school.

Ask your child what you can do to be more active. You might be surprised by what they've learned in PE- and perhaps forgotten what fun it is to play childhood games!

If you're based at home

If you spend most of your day in the house, try these tips to stay active and healthy.

Plan your week so you have to walk to the shops frequently.

Look at ways you can be active in and around the home. Use the stairs to exercise, work in the garden, do housework to music, even hiding the remote control for the TV can help.

Look at community- based activity like yoga or dancing. They don't have to be 'fitness' classes. just something that gets you mov-ing. Falklands Conservation is one potential way to be involved improving the local environment and being active at the same time.

There's no time like the present to make that commitment to yourself: find time to exercise.

Exercise is never a waste of time. It's an important part of a healthy lifestyle.

## Wool report - week ending May 27 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

CURRENCY fluctuations and variable buyer demand impacted on greasy wool prices in Australia and New Zealand last week

As a result, fleece wool lots finer than 21 micron were reported down in price quite significantly. while medium and broader fleece wool lots increased in value.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" price increases were generally only modest for micron categories between 22 and 32 micron, however increases for 24 and 25 micron lots were significant at 5 and 4 pence per kilogram clean respectively

Premium and discount rates for staple strength, wool style, staple length and vegetable matter contamination remained quite steady.

In Australia 85% of the 53,792 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 4.434 bales of crossbred wool of which 88.5% was sold.

Relatively low clearances were also recorded in New Zealand where almost 25% of the national offering of approximately 10,000 bales was passed-in.

Auctions continue next week in South Africa and Australia where approximately 70,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale.

## Secret task force sent to defend Falkands in 1977

DETAILS of how a mini-Royal Navy task force was secretly despatched to the Falklands to defend the islands from Argentinian attack are revealed in documents made public for the first time yesterday.

The tiny flotilla, led by the nuclear-powered hunter killer submarine HMS Dreadnought and accompanied by a pair of frigates and two support vessels, was credited with deterring a full scale invasion in

The then Foreign Secretary David (now Lord) Owen later claimed that if Margaret Thatcher's government had taken similarly robust action, the Argentinians would not have invaded five years later in 1982

James Callaghan's Labour gov-

ernment ordered Operation Journeyman, as it was codenamed, after a party of 50 Argentine "scientists" landed on the island of South Thule prompting fears of a wider attack.

The papers, released to the National Archives, show Owen had insisted the mission was conducted in intense secrecy, with not even the crews being told where they going. There is no need for anyone to know the destination of the frigates. They should be sent on exercise in the Atlantic," he said.

"Only at sea need they know they are going south, even then I cannot see why anyone, other than the captain, should be told their

While the Argentinian government was privately warned by the British that there was a nuclear sub-

marine in the area, the rest of the world was unaware of what was going on. The papers show a high degree of nervousness within Whitehall over the operation - not least about the legality of what they were

doing.

Ministers wanted to be able to the islands - as was done in 1982 but the suggestion was met with concern among officials.

A handwritten note by one warned it could be, "politically escalatory, probably illegal and could set an unwelcome precedent," as well as possibly requiring British ships to fire the first shot.

The "problem" with this, he warned, was that it would be "dependent on intelligence" that an actual Argentine invasion force was

approaching the islands

He suggested they could get round some of the difficulties by not calling it an "exclusion zone" and not making it public, with the Argentinians being told only when they were informed about the presence of the submarine.

In the event, the issue was "deliberately fudged" while the Attorney General Sam Silkin was only asked for his advice on the legality of the operation after the ships had

The concerns were such that HMS Dreadnought was told in its rules of engagement that if it was attacked by Argentine anti-submarine weapons it should "surface or withdraw at high speed submerged. whichever will be of least risk to

## Bolstered coffers mean more Royal Navy frigates for Chile

THE strong international price of copper for the second year running has bolstered Chile's coffers and a percentage of that additional income is earmarked for military equipment purchases including several Royal Navy frigates, German Leopard tanks and refurbished F-16 fighters.

Excess income from copper sales abroad represented last year an additional two billion US dollars for the Chilean government and for the

military who are legally entitled to a percentage, almost 700 million US dollars in these last two years, although part of it has already been spent in cancelling debts.

President Ricardo Lagos and the commanders of the three services agreed this week that those funds will be used in the coming nine years (until 2014) to keep advancing with the modernisation process of the Chilean Armed Forces

The shopping list includes 20 to 28 refurbished F-16 fighter bombers belonging to the Dutch Air Force (with a twenty year horizon), which would replace the current Mirage fleet and act as support for the brand new ten F-16 already purchased di-rectly from United States Total cost is in the range of 150 million US dollars.

The Chilean Navy already has defined the purchase of three mis-

sile Type 23 frigates from the Royal Navy, an operation involving 250 million US dollars, according to Navy commander Admiral Mighe Vergara who would like to see the contract signed before June 18 when he retires

Traditionally Britain has been the main supplier for the Chilean

## Baroness reiterates support for Falklands

BARONESS Margaret Thatcher, guest of honour at the Falkland Islands Government's Annual Reception held at Lincoln's Inn in London, has reminded Islanders of her support for the Falklands.

Some 350 guests attended the Wednesday evening reception with Baroness Thatcher, who was introduced to the guests by David Tatham, former Governor and Chairman of the Falkland Islands Association and Shackleton Scholarship Committee.

She spoke to a large number of people and expressed her continued interest in, and support for, the Islands

A number of Islanders attended including two councillors, John Birmingham and Mike Summers, the Clerk of Councils and the Government Secretary.

Islanders on holiday and living in the UK and Falklands students also attended

Among the other guests were former Governors, former Commanders of British Forces and representatives from the Ministry of Defence and the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

From the political side, several MPs and members of the House of Lords were there. Lord Hurd, President of the Falkland Islands Association and Michael Ancram, Deputy Leader of the Conservative Party and Shadow Secretary of State for Defence, attended.

The speech given by the Falkland Islands Government

Representative, Sukey Cameron, was well received. She said the abiding theme in the Islands over the last year has been that of "reaching out", through political, social and sporting events and visits.

She echoed the comments made by His Excellency the Governor in his Address to the Nation last month, saying progress with Argentina had been less than positive.

"Its government continues to exert economic and political pressure but our commitment to remain part of the UK 'family' is undiminished, and, if anything, strengthened by such pressure."

Miss Cameron said although the South Atlantic Fisheries Commission continues to meet periodically. "...the quality of cooperation we have received from the Argentine side has been disappointing."

A message from Her Majesty the Queen was read out by Mr Tatham, who then proposed the Loyal Toast, before guests watched the Band of the Irish Guards Beating the Retreat on the Lawn.

Baroness Thatcher joined Miss Cameron on the dias along with Major General Sebastian Roberts OBE. Officer Commanding London District, who took the Salute.

#### Bielsa attacks Britain

THE Argentine Foreign Affairs Minister, Rafael Bielsa, has attacked Britain for what he described as continuous "unilateral actions" in the Falkland Islands, in an address to the Organisation of American States.

Mr Bielsa said such actions as hydrocarbons prospecting, selling fishing licences, fisheries policing in the South Atlantic and holding on to the military base at Mount Pleasant "which has an operational capability far beyond the disputed area" are all contrary to the spirit of co-operation, and violate the United Nations resolution which calls on both sides to abstain from introducing unilateral modifications, while the Islands are in the process of "decolonisation."

However, in spite of this "annoying and protracted situation." Mr Bielsa said Argentina looks forward to continuing with the dialogue putting an end to the "colonial situation."

"My government has explicitly reiterated its willingness to negotiate, however the United Kingdom persists in a negative attitude of rejection," claimed Mr Bielsa.

Councillor Roger Edwards described Mr Bielsa's words as "the usual rant" which appeared to be a "lead in" to the Decolonisation Committee (C24) meeting taking place next week at the United Nations in New York.

He added that Britain no longer has colonies: "...they now have selfgoverning Overseas Territories."

Councillors Stephen Luxton and John Birmingham will represent the Falkland Islands at the C24.

Councillor Edwards said the message from the pair would be a "continuation of where we left off last year, reaffirming our right of self-determination as a people in our own right." *PN/MP* 

#### Anniversary of liberation

TO MARK the anniversary of the liberation of the Falkland Islands from Argentine occupation in 1982, Tuesday. June 14 will be a public holiday.

A service of thanksgiving will be held in Christ Church Cathedral on Tuesday morning, followed by a ceremony at the Liberation Monument.

A civic reception, hosted by His Excellency the Governor, will be held in the Falkland Islands Defence Force Club from 11.30am to 12.30pm.

## Driver-less vehicle ends up in Stanley Harbour

DESPITE a high tide and blustery winds, fire fighters and staff from the Public Works Department yesterday managed to retrieve a vehicle from the waters of Stanley Harbour with the minimum of fuss.

It is believed that the vehicle was parked outside the Attorney General's Chambers and, while the driver was inside the building, rolled down the hill and into the harbour.

Although the driver-less Suzuki Vitara crossed a main road, no one was hurt in the incident.

Chief Fire Officer Gardner Fiddes said water was up the level of the windows inside the vehicle and it has sustained some minor damage.

He said he was pleased with the response from the Public Works blacktop gang and dock yard crew. "...some of whom are also retained firefighters."

## Doctor hangs up her stethoscope

AFTER fifteen years' service. Dr Bernadette Paver has resigned from Stanley's King Edward VII Memorial Hospital over pay inequalities.

She is leaving due to "hospital politics" and inequalities in pay which she says became apparent in October/November last year.

At the time Dr Paver made her feelings on the pay issue known to hospital management and said the message she received was, "...hang on a little longer, we'll sort it, we'll

January came, the issue remained unresolved and eventually Dr Paver decided to resign: "I got to a point where I was getting stressed out. If I'm stressed out I can't deliver good care to my patients.'

"I'd asked for a career break informally - and was told that it would be highly unlikely I'd be given one. So I decided to leave.

Her loss from the hospital will come as a blow to patients, particularly those who saw her for acupuncture and treatment for dermatological conditions.

For the last eight or nine years Dr Paver's acupuncture clinic has been well subscribed. "I don't think it works for everybody but there is certainly a large-ish group of people who keep coming back for it or who

are prepared to try it.

"It is nice to be able to offer an alternative to pills or potions.

Dr Paver describes acupuncture therapy as a "very elegant form of treatment" and one which has been well researched. "If it means patients take fewer pills it's got to be a good thing.

This holistic approach to medicine was also reflected in her derma-tology clinics. "A lot of people have skin problems and because skin is something that you see, people also feel self-conscious about it.

"It's not just a case of slapping some cream on and saying it'll get better, it's about treating the whole

Looking back over her fifteen years at KEMH. Dr Paver is particularly pleased with the progress in women's health care: "Before I arrived, although there had been women doctors here, women's health as a particular issue was not something in the forefront of the hospital and I think that has developed very well over the years.

"I'm not saying I have been the driving force, but the fact there has been a woman doctor here, a nurse practitioner, and the midwives team, means there is a group of people in the hospital who are much more focused on women's health than when we first arrived."

Although convinced that her resignation is the right move, Dr Paver harbours a sense of guilt: "I feel slightly guilty because I feel I should have stuck with it a bit longer. But it was causing so much stress to me and, of course, to the family, I just couldn't do it any more. It's not healthy for me or my patients.

As for the immediate future, Dr Paver, whose career before coming to the Falklands took her to the Middle East, will spend time studying before applying for short term locum work overseas.

Her husband. Dr Barry Elsby, also a GP at KEMH, remains on the hospital staff.

## Argos Resources exploration licence extended

ARGOS Resources Ltd has announced the extension of its exploration license for Tranche A in the North Falklands Basin.

The original license for Tranche A was awarded in 1996 and this extension will run until November 2006

The company plans to shoot a 3D seismic programme within the Tranche during 2006.

John Hogan, newly-appointed Chief Executive of Argos Resources, commented, "We are delighted that the Falkland Islands Government has agreed to extend the license which will allow Argos to pursue its programme for Tranche A.

The Tranche contains several structural and stratigraphic prospects with multi-million barrel reserves potential in play types that were not tested during the previous drilling campaign of 1998."

He said the 3D seismic programme in 2006 will "further define and rank these prospects in readiness for later drilling.

The license extension will allow Argos to benefit from the results of a drilling campaign (by Desire Petroleum) covering at least three which is planned to begin in the North Falklands Basin, in early 2006 and, Mr Hogan said, "...be in a position to respond promptly to any successes.

Also announced this week was the award of two licenses to Rockhopper Exploration Limited, adding 1,620 square kilometres to its Falklands portfolio. The company plans to conduct an extensive 3D seismic survey over the acreage during the next two years.

Pierre Jungels, Executive Chairman, commented, "We are pleased to have continued to grow our portfolio and broaden the number of potential drilling opportunities for the company. This is very different acreage to our existing licenses in terms of play types and the stage of exploration the licence has reached.

We are in discussion with a number of seismic contractors about beginning work on our existing acreage and are excited about the drilling programme we are undertaking

with Desire. "We believe that both the prospectivity of the acreage we hold and the highly favourable fiscal regime in place in the Islands will enable us to create significant value

for our investors.

## Suspended sentence for Mount Pleasant man

MOUNT Pleasant resident Charles Barry Yon has received a suspended sentence for possession of a bladed article.

In April, Mr Yon was acquitted of charges of threatening to kill and common assault; his case was adjourned to allow for a pre-sentence report to be prepared for the possession of a bladed article charge, to which he had pleaded guilty.

In court on Wednesday, defence lawyer Richard Marlor said his client's guilty plea was based on the fact he had the knife, but it remained in his pocket until the point where his friend had asked for it and he had handed it over.

Mr Yon had the knife in his pocket, covered with a loose shirt when he went to see Genieve Youde on February 25, 2005. Mr Yon and Ms Youde had been together for two years and had planned to marry before the relationship broke down.

Mr Marlor said the situation had not been helped by the way Ms Youde "blew hot and cold" after breaking off her relationship with Mr Yon. He said Mr Yon "talks with his hands" and it was possible his shirt may have ridden up, revealing the knife to Ms Youde or her current partner Dale Walker, but he was not 'brandishing' the knife and did not

"run amok" with it.
Mr Marlor said Mr Yon was haunted every day by the fact he had taken the knife with him when he had gone to talk to Ms Youde, but he had been "insistent and consistent" that he never had any intention of using it.

Mr Marlor said that since the incident three months ago. Mr Youde had been too embarrassed to go out. often has meals in his room and asks others to go to the shop for him.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said she wished to make it clear that carrying an offensive weapon is serious. She issued Mr Yon with his three month suspended sentence.

Also in court on Wednesday was a Stanley man who faces four charges of assault and one of drinking while on the blacklist.

Robert William Stewart (42) had his case adjourned for one week without entering a plea.

O WHY does the Murrell area need an environmental plan drawn up? Haven't the experts in the fields of environment, fishing and conservation already agreed that where the road is going is all right?

Also, what extra cost will this incurr? Will this mean the road will not be finished this coming season?

Our thanks to Environmental Planning Officer, Dominique Giudicelli,

for the following response A THE Murrell will have a "Man-agement Plan" instead of an Environmental one as, your reader has correctly pointed out, the environmental issues have already been considered and are not significant.

The Plan will address issues to do with the changes which a new Road at Mastin's Point are likely to come about. These issues include a better access to a part of Stanley Common which has previously been difficult to access for most. The Plan is likely to address how to manage such a change and may well come up with a solution such as at Gypsy Cove where vehicular access has been limited in part of the area.

The second issue relates to concern over better access giving more opportunities to catch sea trout. The sea trouts caught in that area are a much valued resource to the local fishing community. Incidentally, the sea trout is not considered to be of "environmental" concern because it is an introduced species which is thought to have displaced the local Zebra Trout. One of the ways in which the Management Plan might deal with the issue of sea trout stocks, is by changing the current daily allowance of six sea trout to a lower number.

It is estimated that the preparation of the draft plan will cost in

the region of £2000. The intention is for the draft to be publicised for public consulation and I look forward to working with Penguin News for that purpose. This work has had to be outsourced due to the lack of available expertise in FIG, at the present moment. ## More rain but sunniest May on record

MAY'S mean temperatures, rainfall and sunshine were all above average for the month, with May's sunshine total being the highest since records began at Mount Pleasant (MPA).

The mean wind speed was slightly above average.

The mean maximum temperature for the month was 7.5C against the average of 6.9C. The highest recorded maximum temperature was 10.4C on both the 10th and the 28th. The lowest maximum 3.8C was recorded on the 29th. The mean minimum temperature was 2.8C against the average of 2.2C. The lowest minimum temperature was -0.8C recorded on the 24th. There were three nights with air frost and

14 nights with a ground frost. Rainfall was above average with 56.0mm against the average of 49.5 mm. The highest daily total of 15.4 mm fell on the 20th. There were

25 days with 0.1 mm or more and 13 days with 1.0 mm or more. There were five instances of fog during the

Snow or sleet fell on four days during the month, but there were no instances of hail. This is the first occasion of this happening in May since records began at MPA.

Total sunshine for the month was 108.4 hours, well above the long term average of 81.5 hours, making May 2005 the sunniest on record The sunniest day was the 11th with 7.8 hours

The mean wind speed for the month was 13.6 knots, slightly above the average of 13.3 knots for May. There were four days with gales (34kts or more over a ten minute period) during the month. The highest gust recorded was 56 knots on the 1st. Gusts exceeding 33 knots occurred on 13 days.

## TV will stay the same, radio will improve

RADIO reception should become clearer in the near future but television reception will remain the same, is the latest message from the British Forces Broadcasting Service (BFBS).

At a time of year when many people become attached to their televisions, the less than perfect reception has left some viewers wondering when they can expect improvement.

BFBS Engineer Adrian Almond said the situation is that there should be an improvement in the 96.5MHz radio in the next few weeks when they are able to move some antennae onto the Cable and Wireless tower temporarily, thereby moving off the damaged

feeder on the Falkland Islands Government mast on Sapper Hill.

The television situation is longer term said Mr Almond, "...to move onto the Cable and Wireless tower would reduce significantly the height of the television transmit aerials, which would result in a much reduced signal in some areas of Stanley and other parts of the Islands."

Mr Almond concluded, "Moves are afoot to make alternative arrangements but in the meantime it is best if the transmissions continue from the existing structure for as long as possible and that means the received signal cannot be improved so the pictures will remain as they

## Industry gets behind new fisheries legislation

FALKLANDS fishing companies have voiced their support for one of the most potentially significant pieces of legislation to the fishery, and to the economy as a whole

If enacted, the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Bill 2005, which has been released for public consultation, will give legislative effect to a major review of fisheries policy including the introduction of property rights. Additionally the Bill provides the first comprehensive update of fisheries legislation since the introduction of the 1986 Ordinance.

The publication of the Bill is the culmination of a lengthy process, which began with consultation on a review of fisheries policy in 2002. Falklands fishing companies played an integral role in the consultation.

The most significant outcome of the policy review, and which is fully reflected in the Bill, was the decision to introduce property rights to the fishery. Director of Fisheries, John Barton, explained that this represents a "major change" from the current system of non-transferable variable duration licenses, "...to a system based on long term (up to 25 years) individual transferable rights owned by Falkland Islanders."

The proposed fishery system, if approved, should provide new impetus to expand and develop the domestic fisheries sector and Mr Barton described the benefits.

"Firstly, overall economic performance of the fisheries sector is expected to be enhanced, because fishing businesses have increased security of access to the resource and flexibility in the way they decide to structure activities to take advantage of business activities.

"Secondly, diversification should occur in the industry as companies have greater choice as to whether they invest in vessels or in value-added activities such as processing

and marketing.

Thirdly, seafood companies should invest more in research and development because long-term rights mean that they will benefit from investments that have longer pay-off periods.

"Fourthly, international competitiveness should also increase as any poorly performing companies sell rights to better performing companies. No longer will they be forced to stay in a fishery, unable to exit without losing everything.

"Fifthly, as the profitability of the domestic seafood sector increases, government income from personal and corporation tax and resource rents should increase."

Penguin News contacted a number of fishing companies to gauge their enthusiasm about the Fisheries Bill and the respondents were all keen to have the Bill made

Drew Irvine of Argos Ltd said his company is "most definitely" in favour of the new legislation as, "...it will help maximise the income from the fishery for the Falklands, not just the local companies." He said the law will enable the industry to, "use the fishing effort we have in the most efficient manner."

Mr Irvine added, "We will make more profit which in turn will mean that we pay more to FIG in tax, which will benefit everyone in the community.

"More profitable companies will be able to buy out less profitable ones, which will benefit the company and also increase the FIG tax take. This is all good news at a time when FIG are struggling to balance the books."

RBC Ltd's Tom Blake described the Bill as "a complex piece of legislation" but he commended the "good process of consultation" leading up to the drafting of the legislation and said he was fully in favour of the principles of the new policy.

He listed a number of benefits the legislation would provide: "Increased security through 25 year rights (which) will allow companies to adopt long term strategies and allow investments which may take several years to produce returns.

"The rights can be put up as security for borrowing which means Falklands companies will have more assets against which to borrow for investment.

"The new policy will allow Falklands companies to work together whereas the previous policy did not encourage cooperation. There will be greater flexibility in the system due to the fact that catch entitlements and rights can be traded."

Beauchene Fishing's Cheryl Roberts said the implementation of the fishery policy would be "beneficial to all."

She explained that among its many advantages were the property rights, "...which give greater opportunity for dialogue between the government and the industry.

Stuart Wallace described the Bill as "key" to building a broader based economy that can weather occasional setbacks.

"Recent budget uncertainties have highlighted the critical importance to our economy of implementing this legislation without further delay. Fishing is our most significant international trade by far and it has great potential to make an even greater contribution. This Bill when implemented establishes the foundation which will facilitate this development."

Mr Wallace said the Bill allows better management of the fishery with regard to conservation and will allow entry by newcomers "since rights will be tradeable".

He said government income from licence fees has the potential to increase, "due to the flexibility the new system will make possible in the rational use of vessels," and added, "The new system will provide industry with essential security and flexibility, permitting rational development and growth, increasing international competitiveness and enhancing overall economic performance."

A number of Falklands companies have very significant investments at risk in the Falklands fishery established over many years and Mr Wallace said the companies involved are relying on the timely implementation of this Bill, "...in order to take forward significant in-

vestment and business decisions which are important, not just for the companies concerned but for the Falklands economy generally."

The greater security will, Mr Wallace said, "...enable more investment in the industry by local companies, in vessels and onshore. This brings new money in, project investments, taxation, purchases, payment for services and increasing employment opportunities."

He added, "We have all seen how vulnerable we can be to heavy dependence on direct government income. We must build a broader based economy that can weather such occasional setbacks. This Fisheries Bill is key to that in the fishery sector."

Hamish Wylie of Seafish (Falklands) Ltd said the current fishing policy has long since achieved all it is able to, and "stagnated" the industry in recent years. "Worse still, it has been divisive and stopped companies working together, resulting in an inefficient and less profitable fishery."

He said the very promise of the new policy has resulted in greater co-operation between companies "for the collective good of the in-

dustry."
"Over the next few years we should see the development of a local fishing industry and support services that will be as recognisable for what it is here, as it is anywhere else in the world."

He said the Bill will enable companies to borrow significant sums of money, "secured against future income and the value of our vessels."

"Currently we cannot guarantee any lender an income of more than a year, and in a world of surplus fishing capacity, our vessels lose any value as soon as they lose access to fish"

With this money, Mr Wylie said, "...we will be able to invest in a whole manner of support services that will bring more of the value of the fishery onto the Islands increase control and profitability.

"Locally-owned vessels spend significant sums in Punta Arenas and Montevideo for simple goods and services that could be provided here.

"With the advent of a containerised reefer container service to the Islands, investment in a fish terminal for the sorting and re-exporting of various species of fish direct to customers becomes possible."

The introduction of the fishing policy will also present a number of challenges, the Director of Fisheries said.

"The Falklands fishery has always been managed using fishing effort limitation as opposed to catch limitation. As with systems based around property rights elsewhere, the Bill provides for the use of Individual Transferable Quotas (ITQs). In the Falklands the ITQ will refer to a proportion of the total allowable effort rather than a proportion of the total catch.

"The property rights system entails significant change to the operating environment for the private sector. It also entails significant change in the administration of the fishery, particularly in relation to the process of creating, awarding and administering property rights.

"The new system does not alter the Falkland Islands Government's powers to manage the fishery to achieve conservation targets, if anything these provisions are strengthened. Similarly, the new system does not alter the government's ability to raise revenue from the fishery."

Property rights are not necessarily a panacea for fisheries development, Mr Barton said, but current fisheries policy (or what might be more appropriately described as license allocation policy) has "served well".

"However, current policy has run its course and was in need of major revision and development, the property rights route seemed apt at this point. A number of features of property rights systems had been identified as desirable from previous policy reviews."

The Bill represents the first major reform and modernisation of law relating to fisheries resources and fisheries management since the introduction of the 1986 Ordinance, Mr Barton said.

"There have been significant developments in fisheries in the Falkland Islands in the intervening 19 years together with a number of developments at an international level. The Bill provides for updating the law to reflect these developments."

The Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Bill 2005 together with associated Explanatory and Policy Memoranda were published in the Falkland Islands Gazette on 31 May 2005.

## Hit and run on Halketts Hill Nightmare goo on MPA road

I WRITE to the person who drove over a black and white cat on Halketts Hill at about half past five in the evening on Thursday (June 2).

You left the cat lying on the road, too badly injured to even drag itself onto the pavement out of the way of any more traffic. Fortunately it was discovered shortly afterwards and many people with more compassion rallied round to get the cat to the vet where it had to be put to sleep, because the injuries were too great.

It was not my cat but I feel the pain of such a careless and callous action, as would any other pet lover.

You could easily have stopped and asked around for the owner, or got the cat to the vet yourself.

I ask you another question, if that had been a young child would you have done the same thing, left it to die on the road where you struck it?

While on the subject of accidents on the road I would like to urge all drivers to please take no-tice of road signs. They are there for the safety of all drivers and pedestrians, so must be obeyed.

The junction of Halketts Hill/ Drury Street is an "accident waiting to happen." Many drivers speed down the hill and round the blind corner without reducing speed, and usually by that time they are over on the right hand side of the road, where oncoming pedestrians could be walking.

Many drivers fail to stop at the 'stop' sign on Drury Street and drive straight on across the junction. I once saw a very senior government official do just that but then he went straight up the hill -'no entry'- two offences!

#### Vacancies Assistant Government Officer and part-time Postal Officer



The Government of South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands is seeking a couple to fill the positions of Assistant Government Officer and part time Postal Officer to be based on South Georgia. The positions are initially for a two year period beginning in November 2005.

Assistant Government Officer

This is a challenging position that will involve approximately eight months living on South Georgia followed by four months leave each year. The successful candidate will be in sole charge for half his/her time and will be working with the Government Officer (GO) during an overlap period in the winter fishing season. The GO and AGO are the Government's representatives and senior officials on the island.

The Government's main sources of income are commercial fishing and tourism. The successful candidate will preferably have experience of both industries and the problems associated with management of remote islands. He/she will have good written, oral and IT skills along with well honed organisational capabilities.

As the job has many roles, one of which is as Fishery Officer, the successful candidate should be able to demonstrate maturity and have the knowledge and ability to enforce relevant regulations.

Candidates for the AGO post should be well qualified and be able to demonstrate several years of useful experience. Knowledge of South Georgia would be an obvious advantage.

Part time Postal Officer

There are a number of tasks complimentary to those of the AGO that justify a part time position. The most important is part time Postal Officer for four months of the year. Other work will include producing material for our website newsletter and assisting with communications if required.

South Georgia demands independence yet also people who enjoy life in a very small community. All persons living and working on South Georgia must pass a stringent medical examination For medical reasons, children are not permitted to live on the island.

The AGO salary will be in the range of c. £22K to £26K per annum plus 20% in lieu of pension dependent on qualification and experience. The part time Postal Officer will receive £650 per month whilst on the island. Accommodation, food and travel from country of origin will also be provided.

THE Falkland Islands Fire and Rescue Department has been successfully elected as a member of the British Fire Services Association.

Chief Fire Officer Gardner Fiddes said he was approached by Sgt Steve Shirley MBE, the Vice Chairman of the British Fire Services Association (BESA), and asked if he would consider joining the association. Sgt Shirley is currently working as crew chief at the Mount Pleasant crash

Mr Fiddes said BFSA has and is continuing to go through many changes, "particularly in their method of training which causes some difficulties for us as many of the courses we have attended in the past no longer exist, having been replaced with Integrated Personal Development System (IPDS)

"It is my aim through the BFSA and another association we are members of, the Joint Oil and Industry Fire Forum (JOIFF), that we will be able to put together bespoke training courses and or work placement for our firefighters.

The BFSA have just started talks with JOIFF who have been members since July 2003."

Benefits of being a member of BFSA include entitlements to the BFSA welfare system for all fire service members, enhanced networking and international recognition for the training and qualifications gained over the last three years by firefighters.

Mr Fiddes said, apart from one firefighter at Stanley's station, all others have gained internationally recognised and accepted qualifications, adding, "BFSA will also give me a tool to recognise the dedication of our firefighters for good conduct, long service and other such medals.

## British ridicule Belgrano trial demand

PEOPLE in Britain have reacted with ridicule and contempt to a demand from Argentina for Baroness Margaret Thatcher to face trial in an international court for ordering the sinking of the Argentine cruiser Belgrano as Prime Minister during the 1982 Falklands War.

The demand is contained in a motion passed by the lower house of the Argentine Parliament, the Chamber of Deputies, reported in the Argentine media several days ago, which has been repeated in a front-page lead story in a British newspaper, the Sunday Express.

This report, reviewed nationwine on various BBC and other radio stations throughout Sunday night, brought hundreds of telephone calls from incredulous listeners expressing their resentment and astonishment.

These calls condemned what the British public regard as shameful Argentine arrogance and effrontery in criticising Prime Minister Thatcher's legitimate response of defending British territory and lives from Argentine aggression against the Falkland Islands.

Many British callers believe this latest demand has back-fired on Argentina in exposing its own double standards. Its aircraft attacked several British warships and a merchant vessel in the task force with heavy casualties, and the three military juntas in the run-up to the invasion stand accused of torturing and murdering more than twenty-thousand of their own citizens without any wide scale attempt to bring their military death squads to trial.

Argentine demands to punish Margaret Thatcher date back many years. The authorities in Britain and even Argentina's own naval commanders have never taken them seriously. They lack credence and legitimacy even in Argentina where the latest move is not a government demand and does not have the approval of the Senate even for action by the Argentine Congress.

## Fire service joins international network | Planning and Building news

THE June meeting of the Planning and Building Committee was of comparatively short duration as there were only nine applications for planning permission and thirteen for a building permit to be considered

Chaired by Councillor Richard Cockwell, other members attending were Councillor Norma Edwards, Gerald Cheek, Les Harris, Graham Middleton and Mike Harris. Apologies were re-ceived from Mike McLeod who was unable to attend.

The first three applications were for permission in principle for the erection of dwellings.

These had all been deferred at a previous meeting or meetings and details of their location are as fol-lows: land at 28 Davis Street for Graham Fiddes: land rear of 15 Brandon Road for Richard Rogers; and on land which is part of 5 Kent Road for Derek and Jan Cantlie. In every case permission was granted subject to the standard outline conditions.

The rest of the applications were new submissions and here too, conditional planning permission was granted for the following: erection of an American Steel Span warehouse for storage use on Lookout Industrial Estate for Peter McKay; temporary siting of three twenty-feet long containers for use as storage during alterations to Malvina House Hotel on Ross Road for Stanley Services Limited: erection of a domestic garage at the rear of 94 Davis Street for Hector Tellez: the display of a sign for

Deanos' Bar on John Street for Kevin Connolly; an extension to the approved NGN building at their main office complex on Ross Road for Cable and Wireless Limited; and the crection of a domestic garage at 21 Hansen Hill for Eddie Grimmer.

Members then moved on to hear the report from the Building Adviser, Graham France, who was making his last appearance at the Committee, on which building permits had been granted since the last meeting.

There were six of these, in addition to which he reported on two cases in Camp on West Falkland: the proposed extension to his dwelling at Hill Cove for Peter Nightingale, and the erection of a wool workshop and classroom at Dunnose Head Farm for Clive and Rosemary Wilkinson.

In both instances the Committee agreed to the grant of a Building Permit.

In a further four cases it was reported that more information was still awaited and another, a domestic garage, did not require a permit as it fell within the "exempt" classes of structures.

Apart from a word from the chair thanking Graham for his past services to the Committee, that concluded the "open" session of the meeting.

The next meeting of this Committee is scheduled for Thursday. July 14, 2005, commencing at 9am and to be held as usual in the Liberation Room at the Secretariat.

## Pension Scheme members' investment choices

By Alison Inglis, Crown Counsel (A) MEMBERS of the Falkland Islands Pensions Scheme (FIPS) can now choose whether to invest their pension savings in equities, bonds, cash or any combination.

This move to give members more control over crucial investment decisions follows the introduction of the new All Equity Portfolio which offers members investment exposure to overseas equity markets.

Investment managers Fidelity offer five investment funds - the equity-based Balanced Portfolio and All Equity Portfolio, the bond-based UK Gilt Fund and UK Corporate Bond Fund, and a Cash Fund. Members can split their future pension contributions between the five funds in whatever proportions they choose. They can also reapportion their accumulated personal pension account across the funds.

A default option - LifePlan is offered for members who do not feel confident about taking direct control of their personal retirement saving strategy. However, Fidelity have produced a questionnaire called 'What type of investor are you?' which allows members to make investment decisions after assessing their investment aims, family and financial circumstances, and personal attitude to risk.

The Fidelity questionnaire, together with another Fidelity publication called 'Guide to investing' which explains more about saving for retirement, are being sent to every FIPS member along with information sheets on each of the five investment funds, and an investment instruction form

Members are also asked to consider their individual 'target retirement age', as this can also have an effect on investment decisions as they approach retirement, when most individuals want to take a more conservative approach to protect their accumulated pensions savings from market volatility.


All investment decisions can be amended at any time. The Pensions Board and Pensions Officer are not able to provide investment advice, but links to independent financial advisers in the UK can be found through the FIPS website www.fipension.co.uk.

Members may also enjoy us-ing the website to check the performance of their individual pension account, or to use the Pension Planner modelling tool which illustrates the impact of making changes to your retirement plan be it altering your contribution rate, planned retirement age, or the amount you would like to receive once you retire.

## Hundreds enjoy 'Year of the Sea' exhibition









THE relationship between Falkland Islanders and the sea has been commemorated by the Falkland Islands Museum in a bumper display at the weekend.

More than two hundred people attended the Year of the Sea Exhibition, a SeaBritain 2005 event, organised by the Museum and National Trust at the weekend.

The aims of SeaBritain 2005, organised primarily by Greenwich National Maritime Museum in conjunction with more than 80 other large UK organisations, are twofold; to encourage an appreciation of the sea and to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the Battle of Trafalgar and the death of Admiral Lord Nelson.

The Museum and National Trust felt these aims were equally relevant to Falkland Islanders and planned a series of events to draw attention to the Islands' maritime heritage and the vital role that the sea plays in the lives of Islanders.

The weekend exhibition at the Parish Hall, covered the many ways the sea has affected life in the Falklands, past and present ranging from leisure, to local shipping, to industry.

Of the 300 or so photographs that were on display, up to 70% had not been previously displayed and many were loaned specifically for the exhibition.

Also on display was an impressive selection of art work produced by Community School students, under the guidance of art teacher Tim Simpson. Their remit was simply "the Falklands and the sea."

Museum Manager, Leona Roberts said she was "absolutely delighted" at the level of interest -"and very surprised."

"We were really not sure what

to expect in terms of attendance, but could never have hoped for so much support."

She added, "It was fantastic to hear everyone exchanging memories and stories as they looked around, and to listen to the very fond way in which Islanders remember vessels like the *Darwin*.

"We have been offered many more photographs, models and objects and may well aim for a sequel later in the year."

Leona said the Museum staff were grateful to "the many individuals who loaned items for the exhibition - it was this generosity that made the event such a success."

She added particular thanks to Duncan Brake from the Fisheries Department "for producing the slideshow which was very popular" and to the Falkland Islands Company, "...for giving us access to their archive and loaning a tremendous amount of photographs and *Darwin* memorabilia."

## Remembering Marjorie May McPhee: 1934 - 2005

By the family of the late Marj McPhee

MARJ was born at the Malo, Teal Inlet on January 14, 1934, the youngest daughter of Alex and Elizabeth McCallum.

They later moved to Salvador and were waiting to move to San Carlos when Alex died in 1942.

Elizabeth, Rene and Marj stayed at Salvador with George Reive, Elizabeth's brother, for a year or so until Elizabeth obtained a housekeeping job in Stanley, initially at Cable Cottage for the doctor and later at Stanley House. Rene recalls that Marj would run errands on her pushbike in order to earn some pocket money.

After Rene married Billy Duncan in 1947, Marj went to live with the couple at Teal Inlet. It was whilst at Teal Inlet that Marj met Owen McPhee who was employed there as the storekeeper/book-keeper/teacher.

The couple were married in Christ Church Cathedral on May 9, 1952 and settled in Stanley. Shortly after their son Terence's birth in 1953. Marj and the baby travelled to Douglas Station to join Owen who was acting Manager for six months.

They then moved to Teal Inlet and whilst there a second son, Ian, was born in 1954.

In 1959 the family travelled to UK and after nine months away

returned to Douglas Station. A daughter, Natalie, was born in 1966 and completed Marj and Owen's family.

Whilst at Douglas, Marj was employed for some time as cook at the Cookhouse. Although this was not an easy task with a peat fire, it was one that Marj thoroughly enjoyed.

In 1971 Marj, Owen and Natalie moved to Stanley (Terence and Ian had been lodging with Rene and Billy whilst attending the Senior School and, later, beginning work).

Marj undertook a variety of part time work during the 1970's including domestic work at the Upland Goose Hotel and Government House. fill-in operator at the telephone exchange, and shop assistant at the Speedwell Store.

After the completion of Stanley Airport Marj purchased the laundry equipment from Johnston Construction and the garage at 14 John Street resembled on occasion a Chinese laundry as Marj washed bags of sheets for visiting British Antarctic Survey and charter vessels. In 1977 Marj went to work at the Post Office, initially on a temporary basis, before joining the permanent staff where she remained until her retirement in 1998.

Marj was a great craftsperson and usually had several craft projects on the go, ranging from



knitting, embroidery, and crochet to stitching a kneeler for the Cathedral; many of these projects ended up in the annual Craft Fair where she won many prizes. In addition she was very fond of spinning and, as well as having a wheel at home, she usually attended the Monday evening meeting of the Guild of Spinners and Weavers.

Baking was another of Marj's passions and she was proud to have baked and decorated the wedding cakes for all her children as well as for numerous other couples. Marj was also a keen supporter of the Horticultural Show.

Christ Church Cathedral played a large part in Marj's life. As a regular church goer, and Church Warden, she was a familiar sight asking people to "move up a bit and make room for one more" when a large congregation was present. Marj was also an active participant in other Church activities particularly fundraising events.

Although Marj made several visits overseas, both on holiday and accompanying Owen for medical treatment, she did not enjoy travelling either by air or sea. She always enjoyed hearing about other people's travels though and met and made friends with many visitors to the Islands as well as closely following any travels undertaken by members of her family.

A sociable person by nature. Marj was always happy to entertain friends and family for a meal and conversation, generally interspersed with reminiscences of old Camp life.

Marj always said the progress of camp travel suited her age; she was pleased to have been able to travel around by horseback in her youth, then overland by vehicle and in recent times over the Camp road network.

Marj was involved in many activities – Women's Corona Society, Guild of Spinners and Weavers, Christ Church Cathedral, and she was a Justice of the Peace – and we are sure she will be missed by many.

## Common bacterial infections of the mouth

The most common infections of the mouth are dental caries (tooth decay) and periodontal disease (gum disease). They are the consequences of excessive and prolonged accumulation of dental plaque on the surfaces of teeth.

Dental plaque is a biofilm. The term describes the communities of microorganisms attached to a tooth surface. Bacteria in biofilms form a sticky tangled web that connect the bacteria cells and anchor them to the tooth surface and to each other. Dental plaque is found naturally on tooth surfaces and is believed to be part of the natural defences for protection of teeth, however if allowed to accumulate for long periods of time the type of bacteria within it alters and the original bacteria, that attached to the tooth surface, are replaced by harmful bacteria that cause the common bacterial infec-

tions of the mouth.

The role of dental plaque in tooth decay has been clearly demonstrated in several human and animal studies carried out between the 50s and 70s. What was also established by these studies were that dental decay occurred on tooth surfaces at the sites where dental plaque was thick It also requires a diet that consists of a high quantity of fermentable carbohydrates. Where a thick layer of plaque has been allowed to accumulate, a bacterial species known as streptococcus mutans replaces the original bacteria in plaque and it converts fermentable carbohydrates, most commonly found in foodstuffs with a high sugar content, to an acid that is capable of dissolving the enamel on the tooth surface and thus initiating tooth decay

This acid is produced very quickly after eating or drinking something with sugar in it and where dental plaque is thickest it can keep it in contact with the tooth surface for up to three hours. The significance of this is that dental decay is not simply related to the amount of sugar consumed, but also the frequency, as such, eating snacks or consuming drinks with a high content of sugar between meals has a detrimental effect on teeth. This also applies to seemingly innocuous activities such as frequent cups of tea or coffee with sugar in them.

Fluoride applied topically to teeth is incorporated into tooth enamel and makes it more resistant to acid dissolution. This occurs when fluoride containing toothpastes and mouthwashes are used regularly. It will also reverse or arrest the process of early decay as long as this is accompanied by a reduction in sugar intake and improvement in oral hygiene. Ozone treatment of teeth has recently been promoted in the press, as having properties that arrest tooth decay however there is

no good evidence to support this. Saliva contains natural buffers that neutralise acid produced by bacteria in dental plaque and confers protection to teeth against dental decay. Saliva production is reduced during sleep and as a side effect of some drug therapies and radiotherapy that involves the salivary

glands Rapid destruction of several teeth is frequently seen in children who take bottles with sugary drinks and milk to bed with them. It is also seen in patients on drugs such as tricyclic antidepressants or after radiotherapy who develop xerostomia (dry mouth) however in these latter groups this can be avoided if they reduce their consumption of sugar containing foods and use a fluoride mouthwash or have fluoride applied to their teeth by a dentist regularly.

Periodontal disease is the collective term for a number of pathological conditions characterized by inflammation and degeneration of the gums, periodontal ligament, and the bone that supports teeth in the jaws. Apart from in a few very rare situations it is also caused by dental plaque that has been allowed to accumulate around the necks of teeth and between teeth. Most people are aware of what is often referred to in adverts as tartar, which will cause gums to swell and bleed spontaneously or when brushing teeth and can also cause halitosis (bad breath). The most common forms of periodontal disease are gingivitis and periodontitis.

Gingivitis is the condition that presents as red. slightly swollen gums that bleed easily, however the bone supporting the teeth is not usually affected. In some individuals it will progress to periodontitis a condition in which there is progressive loss of the bone supporting teeth. As consequence of this teeth initially become loose and mobile and if bone loss continues they are eventually lost. Unlike tooth decay periodontal disease does not require sugar in the diet and the mere presence of dental plaque on tooth surfaces is sufficient to cause it to develop and progress.

The reasons why gingivitis should progress to periodontitis are not completely understood and it would appear that some individuals are more susceptible than others. Anyone can develop periodontitis. even after several years of having mild gingivitis however there is no doubt that once periodontitis has developed it will develop more rapidly and be more difficult to treat and control in individuals who smoke or in a diabetic whose blood sugar is poorly controlled.

Treatment by a hygienist and dentist is directed at debridement of dental plaque and tartar from tooth surfaces, however the effectiveness of this is limited if it is not followed by improvements in oral hygiene on the patients part, between appointments or reduction in smoking.

Almost all of us know an adult who has a healthy mouth with no fillings. This invariably is an individual with good oral hygiene and limited consumption of sugar containing foodstuffs. The evidence from observational studies of these individuals is that preventative measures are effective at controlling the development and progress

dental infections.

Materials have been available for the restoration of teeth for over strengthens teeth is yet to be discovered.

Any tooth that has been restored is weaker and more susceptible to decay, periodontal disease and fracture than the original intact tooth. From the moment a restoration is completed it acquires a covering of plaque that will produce acids when sugar is consumed. It is also going to be subjected to forces generated between teeth during chewing and large fluctuations in temperature and acidity from dif-ferent foodstuffs. In fact the restoration begins the process towards failing the moment it is completed and whether this takes a few months or over twenty years is not simply a matter of how skilfully executed the dentistry is, but also how well an individual maintains the teeth and restorations. The message is clear; prevention is better than the cure and the need for this is greater the more restorations an individual has and the greater the complexity of their dental work

Plaque control is the collective term used to describe the efforts by dentists, hygienists and patients to keep the amount of plaque on their teeth to a minimum. Frequent removal of plaque from teeth by tooth brushing prevents harmful acid producing bacteria replacing harmless bacteria and establishing themselves in dental plaque. Bacteria proliferate very rapidly and this replacement can occur in less than twentyfour hours. Good oral hygiene is achieved by good plaque control practices, which in its simplest form is spending sufficient time, at least twice a day brushing teeth. Flossing and use of interdental brushing are also part of this as is professional debridement by a hygienist or den-

Most people fail to remove dental plaque from the necks of teeth and areas between them and as a result develop redness, swelling and bleeding of the gums. If plaque is allowed to persist it becomes calcified and hard and no longer amenable to removal with a toothbrush. This is known as calculus (tartar) and it in turn becomes lined with more plaque, which is more difficult to remove than plaque on a normal tooth surface. Calculus and plaque persisting on the necks and roots of teeth can lead to breakdown of the bone that supports teeth in the jaws.

Toothbrushes with small or medium size heads are preferable, however they require use of a tooth brushing technique that is effective at removing plaque from the necks of teeth and the areas between them. Disclosing tablets and solu-tions are available that stain plaque and help demonstrate to an individual if their brushing technique is working. Toothbrush handles can be modified and customised to aid their use for most people who have difficulty handling them on account of a disability.

Mains rechargeable electric toothbrushes are excellent if used with an effective tooth brushing technique, however the battery powered varieties are ineffective

There are several aids available for cleaning between teeth and of these the studies suggest dental floss is the most effective. People with bridges should use super floss regularly. Any instructions given on tooth brushing techniques by your dentist or hygienist should be taken seriously

Sugar when used in this context means sugar-containing foodstuffs and drinks. The greater the sugar content of a food item the greater is the quantity of acid produced and the longer it will act for. A list of common items and their equivalent sugar content in teaspoons is available from the British Dental Health Foundation and will soon be on their website. Several canned drinks contain the equivalent of seven teaspoons of sugar per can and brands of chocolate biscuits over four in a single biscuit.

Food and drinks with high sugar content should be avoided and fruit is preferable as a spack rather than sweets and chocolate bars. As acid dissolution of a tooth surface can continue for up to three hours after sugar is consumed, foodstuffs with a high sugar content are best consumed as a dessert with a main meal rather than as a snack between

Young children should not be given bottles to take to bed with milk or sugary drinks. If this is an established practice that is difficult to break they should be gradually weaned off sweetened drinks by diluting their bottles with increasing amounts of water.

Fluoride is available in a number of products, however as already mentioned when applied topically to the surfaces of teeth it is very effective at reducing tooth decay. I am informed that the water in the Falkland Islands is not fluoridated; as such the use of fluoride containing toothpastes in individuals at low risk of dental caries is sensible. Those at high risk should also use a fluoride mouthwash daily.

Past disease experience is a good predictor of an individuals risk and anyone with a large number of restorations should regard themselves as high risk. There are several types of mouthwashes and it is important to check you are using one that contains fluoride.

Summary

Tooth decay and gum disease are common bacterial infections. The adverse and detrimental effects of

them can be minimised and often

avoided by
Plaque control practices directed at keeping the levels of harmful bacteria in the mouth low

- Keeping the number of occasions bacteria are presented with sugary foodstuffs and drinks low
- Strengthening teeth with fluoride

Good eating and oral hygiene practices established in children at early age are often maintained into adulthood.

Wool report - week ending June by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

CURRENCY fluctuations throughout the world once a gain had a significant impact on wool prices In South Africa, as an example, the value of the Rand fell by almost 7% relative to the US\$ and by almost 4% relative to the Euro during the

week. As a consequence of the changed currency circumstances, the South African wool market rose by 5.1%.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" price increases and price falls occurred in Australia during the week. Prices falls were restricted to the finer end of the micron spectrum (18 to 20 micron) while medium and broad fleece wool lots were generally up in value by another penny or two per kilogram clean!

 Modiano Wool, one of the key processors of Falkland Islands wool, were once again very active in the world markets buying a reported 25% of the South African offering and also over 2300 bales in Australia.

 Premium and discount rates for staple strength, wool style, staple length and vegetable matter contamination remained quite steady. It is felt that variation in average staple strength and style between lots of wool would remain as key issues affecting price of Falkland Island wool after micron

In Australia 84% of the 56,086 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 4.488 bales of crossbred wool of which 89% was

sold. Approximately 90% of the 10,428 bale South African offering was sold.

Was sold.

Auctions continue next week in New Zealand and Australia where approximately 56,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale.

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

## Falklands upsets Argentina at UN meeting

FALKLANDS councillors have sought to clarify comments made during their addresses to the United Nations Decolonisation Committee (C24) which have angered the Argentine Foreign Minister. Rafael Bielsa.

The Argentine press yesterday reported a hostile atmosphere at the meeting, particularly alleged comments from the Falklands speakers that the Argentine government was behaving like a "bully" and that, except for the military threat, it was behaving like the Galtieri government in 1982

Speaking from Washington yesterday. Councillor John Birmingham said it appeared there had been a misunderstanding in translation about his and Councillor Luxton's speeches. It and Mr Bielsa seemed to think that I had accused this present Argentine government of acting in a similar way to the juntas of the 70s and 80s. That is not my understanding of what I said and I would not say that either

"I think it was a translation problem: in no way is this government the same as those disgraceful juntas.

"Mr Bielsa was clearly upset at the meeting and he felt insulted." Mr Bielsa was also reportedly upset by the Lincoln's Inn reception held last week. He is reported to have said. "My country watched that merry celebration with bitterness."

Councillor Birmingham said Mr Bielsa seemed to be of the impression that "it is purely a liberation party" whereas, "my understanding is that it is an annual event that has been going on since well before the 1982 conflict."

Before the Decolonisation Committee meeting on Wednesday, Councillors Luxton and Birmingham met the Chairman of the C24

Councillor Birmingham said he told the Chairman, "... we felt that the change in the situation between Spain and Gibraltar has an impact on the Falklands/Argentine issue and he accepted that that was a significant development."

At the C24 meeting, the Falklands councillors met with the two Argentine petitioners. Falklands-born James Douglas Lewis, whose great-grandfather also came from the Falklands, and Louis Vernet.

In his speech to the meeting, Councillor Birmingham spoke of the way the present Argentine administration has "gone out of its way to make life difficult for the Falklands" and said their attitude to the Falkland Islands and Falkland Islanders. "...is making more countries and people look at this present Argentine government as a bullying administration, who don't seem to understand the realities of the 21st century."

Councillor Luxton condemned the Argentine government's "unacceptable" ban on charter flights to the Falklands.

The reality is that Argentina has effectively imposed an illegal unilateral economic sanction against the Falkland Islands people and economy, and I believe each and every country in the United Nations should be outraged by that situation.

. "Argentina will of course reply that they are content to allow Argentine charter flights to come into the Falkland Islands, but after the dark days of the 1970s when Argentine interests controlled both our air links and our fuel supply, we will never, ever, allow the control of our critical services to fall into the hands of an Argentine government again."

Yesterday. Councillor Birmingham summed up the differences in the Falklands and Argentine presentations: "Their's were mainly history lessons. We emphasised the here and now aspects of the situation."

He said presentations by other delegates on the issue could be divided into three parts: "The Latin delegates, who were of the opinion that the Islands belong to Argentina; others such as Syria who said both parties should speak; then there were Sierra Leone, Tanzania and Grenada, who were supportive and spoke of the Falkland Islands, not the Malvinas.

"The Russians, at the end, said that both sides should talk."

When asked how effective he felt the presence of the Falklands at the C24 meeting had been. Councillor Birmingham said. "Totally - there's no question of a future council not going to that meeting.

"It would be the wrong thing to do and would send the wrong messages."

Yesterday afternoon, Councillors Birmingham and Luxton attended meetings with the South American and European sections of the US State Department.

They are both scheduled to attend a variety of meetings over the coming week.

## Shearers do the Islands proud at world champs

TWO Falklands shearers have done themselves and their country proud at the Golden Shears World Championships in Australia

Jan Clarke, son of Michael and Jeanette Clarke of Kings Ridge Farm, and Paul Phillips, son of Terence and Carol Phillips of Hope Cottage, qualified to represent the Islands in shearing competitions held during Sports Week.

They performed exceptionally well against stiff global competition in Toowoomba, Queensland

Unlike previous Falklands entrants in the Golden Shears, who received financial sponsorship to attend the event. Jan and Paul were required to fund themselves, right down to having to buy their own Falkland Islands shirts.

Sadly, despite the shearing profession being one of the Falklands oldest, the two Islanders were the only team at the championships without sponsorship from their home country.

Jan and Paul have been shearing

ATTEMPTING to write an editorial the morning after Liberation Day feels a foolhardy act but that's just the unfortunate way my week has panned out.

Whether you chose to spend the occasion in euphoric celebration or quiet reflection I trust it was a fulfilling day; not only does it present a chance to remember what went on in 1982 but also to rejoice in the progress the Islands have made over the ensuing years.

Sadly, underneath this reflection and thanksgiving, there is a sense of frustration this year - as with last - that although we have flourished since 1982 the divide between the Falklands and Argentina seems deeper than ever.

The progress - and goodwill - which appeared to have been established under Menem's administration is now a distant memory and the words of the councillors at the C24 were again of Argentina's uncooperative and difficult approach to bilateral issues.

Bielsa, who by his very nature is rather rabid on the Falklands issue, is now a candidate for election and, if he continues at the Foreign Ministry during the campaign, will likely be tempted to use the 'Malvinas' as a canvassing

tool in the coming months.

Then, to top it off, we hear of the launch of the official history of the war which promises to unveil secret intelligence.

At first this may seem rather innocuous but one can't help wondering if this could rock the boat even more for the Falklands

Argentina - particularly its press - will undoubtedly focus on the aspects of this intelligence which relate to Chilean help and the government could easily use this to place pressure on Chile. We've witnessed this enough in the past to worry how such pressure could in turn affect us.

Perhaps I'm being too sensitive and overestimating the Argentine response but from past lessons we know that if they see an opportunity to

score points, they will take it.

It would be sensible to brace ourselves for fallout.

IT'S AMAZING how many suggestions for editorial subjects I received while I was out on Liberation Day.

While undoubtedly amusing, some were far too obscene or defamatory to even consider. However one, criticising the lack of condom machines in toilets in our bars and restaurants, was, I think, valid.

Almost everywhere else in the world, be it a family restaurant or a seedy

club, these machines are installed in washrooms.

Perhaps it would be an admission that ours is not a wholly chaste community if these facilities were provided, but I would have thought the sacrifice of a virtuous front is more desirable than an outbreak of Chlamydia.

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## Falklands War official history verdict: 'result could have been different'

NEW revelations in the soon to be published British official History of the Falklands Campaign indicate that a few key acts by Argentine commanders could have produced a different outcome. possibly avoiding defeat.

And, if General Galtieri's military junta had shown restraint instead of launching an impetuous invasion. Argentina may peacefully have attained its long-term ambition of sovereignty over the Falkland Islands because economic and social stagnation and population decline before 1982 could eventually have made the situation "untenable'

These are two of the many controversial arguments examined in this official history, written by one of Britain's foremost military academics, Professor Sir Lawrence Freedman, who is Professor of War Studies at King's College, London, invited by the Government to carry out the task.

He has taken eight years to collate and assess masses of information, much of it hitherto secret in-

telligence.

The issue is comprehensively covered in two volumes. The first deals with the origins of the Anglo-Argentine dispute going back centuries and with the run-up to invasion. The second volume covers the conduct of the war and its aftermath until diplomatic relations were restored in 1990

The two volumes run to more than 130,000 words and cost £90, published by Frank Cass Limited. In advance of publication, Professor Freedman has given extensive clues to his conclusions in an article in the magazine History Today.

Professor Freedman had access to secret official files which focus fresh light on the help given to the United Kingdom by Chile and the United States and also on the tensions that developed in American-British relations in the immediate aftermath of the invasion as President Ronald Reagan and his Secretary of State, General Alexander Haig, acted at first as even-handed intermediaries in an attempt to achieve a diplomatic settlement.

At the same time the Pentagon and the United States military were making "extraordinary efforts" to supply equipment and materials, for example updated side-winder missiles which proved so effective on Harrier jump-jet aircrast.

The history may also explain the mystery of why a helicopter carrying elite SAS troops made an emergency landing on Chilean territory

Professor Freedman emphasises that "success could by no means be taken for granted" as the military commanders knew at the time. In this, he echoes the assessment by the task force commander, Admiral Sir Sandy Woodward, that it was a close-run outcome as ammunition was expended and his ships were mercilessly battered by Argentine air attack and severe Atlantic weather.

The professor points out that it was a war fought with a "small margin for error". The campaign and individual military engagements "could be turned by a moment of heroism or a loss of nerve. by an act of will or a critical error'

He suggests the outcome could have been different if the Argentines had not made a series of military errors such as not keeping their navy at sea after the sinking of the Belgrano, or by attacking warships instead of the ships carrying troops and equipment, and by not patrolling "more aggressively" as the British advanced towards the capital. If they had acted differently, he says, "the result could have been different. And the loss of one of the two British aircraft carriers would have forced the British Government to reconsider"

With so many previous accounts of the war written by the Minister. Margaret Prime Thatcher, other Ministers, military commanders, diplomats and journalists, and with so many contradictions, he says an official history, given access to the best possible official documentary information, can explore the "lingering controversies" and also examine how Britain arrived at some decisions and not others

Professor Freedman recognises that access to so much official material might have resulted in a "sanitised account" confirming the "official line" and expressing only "safe and agreed opinions". He insists that the credibility of his history depends on it being his "own independent review

While accounts of the military campaign remain confused, Professor Freedman has benefited from full diplomatic information available from two key ambassadors. Sir Nicholas Henderson in Washington, and Sir Anthony Parsons at the United Nations.

## Court news

## Two jailed after April attack

TWO men have been jailed and a third sentenced to 100 hours community service after an attack on a fourth man in April.

Christopher Saunders, an RAF firefighter from Mount Pleasant, and Ryan Hawksworth and Andrew MacDonald of Stanley had all earlier pleaded guilty to charges following a number of incidents which occurred on the night of April 1 and in the early hours of April 2.

In a court appearance in May, it was alleged that Mr Saunders had chased Mr Gene Berntsen from the Globe Tavern, caught him and threw him to the ground. A witness said Mr Saunders had "deliberately and repeatedly" kicked Mr Berntsen in the head.

The prosecution alleged that when police arrived at the scene, Mr Saunders admitted what he had done and there was no more trouble from him.

Mr Hawksworth and Mr MacDonald however turned on the police, with the latter threatening to burn one of the police officers in his house: Mr Hawksworth was also alleged to have spat in the face of the proprietor of Michele's Cafe.

Defending Mr Hawksworth, who was also alleged to have punched Mr Roy McKay earlier on the same evening. Mr Ian Warburton said his client's actions would, "probably justify a custodial sentence," and that this, "...might allow Ryan time to reflect."

When sentencing Mr Hawksworth, Senior Magistrate Mrs Clare Faulds said the incident was "very serious" and that it was a "very bad blemish" on Mr Hawksworth's character. She went on to say that in particular it was because Mr Hawksworth may have kicked and punched Mr Berntsen when he was on the ground that she had to impose a custodial sentence of two months

She also ordered him to pay \$250 court costs

Christopher Saunders was also sentenced to two months in prison and ordered to pay £250 court costs

In summing up Mrs Faulds called his actions "totally reprehensible." She added that two months imprisonment for a case of this nature was. "a very light sentence," but noted that his career with the RAF was "in ruins."

Andrew MacDonald was sentenced to 100 hours of community service and ordered to pay £70 in court costs.

Mrs Faulds told Mr MacDonald. "You totally lost your head and ploughed in without any thoughts as to the consequences." She said this could not be allowed to go unpunished. A custodial sentence was not imposed as Mrs Faulds said she felt Mr MacDonald was, "not the prime mover."

Mrs Faulds thanked Ms Jan McGinness from the Social Work Team for compiling comprehensive pre-sentence reports and she also thanked the police, Mr Warburton and Mr Richard Marlor for their part in distinguishing the facts in such a complicated case.

Also in court on Wednesday, Mr Mervyn Lee was sentenced to one year's probation on the condition that he continue with anger management counselling. Mr Lee was charged with assault after a fight which broke out at Lookout Lodge on March 17.

## Lan passengers annoyed by forms

A "HICCUP" aboard Saturday's Lan flight to the Falklands caused an indignant response in some passengers.

On the leg of the flight from Puerto Montt to Punta Arenas, the cabin crew began handing out landing cards and customs declaration forms for entry to Argentina

The Collector of Customs, Mr Robert King was on the flight and said, before the cards were handed out, he saw the cabin crew forward in a corner of the cabin with a tray of forms and, "...they appeared to be deliberating between themselves as to what they were supposed to hand out and when.

"I suspect they were new to the route or at least had not been on it for some time, as it certainly seemed as if they were unsure as to what exactly they were supposed to do."

Once one of the cabin crew began handing out forms and was coming towards Mr King, he said he could see they were for Argentina so he got ready to "state that in the case of passengers destined for the Falklands, there was no requirement for anyone to complete any such entry forms for the stopover at Rio Gallegos, as we were not seeking entry to Argentina, being passengers in transit, strictly airside."

gers in transit, strictly airside."
However, before the air hostess reached his row, Mr King said, another passenger took issue, and brought him into the conversation. "During the course of my discussion with the particular cabin crew lady, she said by way of explanation, that the forms were being handed out in case anyone was disembarking in Rio Gallegos and also that as relevant forms for the Falklands had not been put on board the aircrast at Santiago, they thought that giving out forms, albeit Argentine, would be better than not handing out anything "I made it clear to them that

"I made it clear to them that such forms would be entirely inappropriate and unacceptable for use in the Islands and that they should expect the correct forms to be put on board the aircraft by the Lan despatcher at Punta Arenas, as that is where the stocks were held, not Santiago."

Mr King said the member of cabin crew was apologetic and no more of the forms were offered out. He commented, "I am sure there were no hidden motives; although somewhat irritating to us, it was simply a case of the cabin crew not being up to speed on what they were supposed to do and also not aware that what they had agreed innocently between themselves could potentially have led to some unsavoury incidents of air-rage!"

Jennie Forrest, Director of International Tours and Travel Ltd. agents for Lan, yesterday commented, "During the flight inbound to the Falklands on 21 May it was brought to our attention that some passengers had unfortunately been offered the incorrect landing forms.

"The airline was duly informed and last week confirmed that they would be soon be holding training for the cabin-crew in respect of the entry forms required for the route and for the Falklands."

On arrival at Rio Gallegos, there was a second hiccup; the passengers were first requested to remain on the aircraft due to the short time the plane would be on the ground, however as they would be refuelling, that they should remain seated with seat belts unfastened. This is also common practice for the Puerto Montt stop

Some minutes later however. Mr King said, "we were requested to deplane by reason of the refuelling operation and were taken to an airside lounge to await the completion of the operation after which we reboarded.

"I can only hazard a guess as to why the change of mind and us having to deplane, but presume it was for safety reasons."

Jennie Forrest confirmed the request from the flight's captain to disembark in Rio Gallegos on June 11 was because the aircraft was being refuelled.

## Man 'makes a mockery' of the Blacklist

A MAN has been sentenced to a month in jail and removed from the Blacklist by the Senior Magistrate, who said he had "made a mockery of it" by continuing to drink.

Robert William Stewart had pleaded guilty to four charges of assault and one of drinking while on the Blacklist.

All five charges related to an incident that took place at Mr Stewart's home on May 14.

After consuming approximately ten beers, Mr Stewart had argued with his wife. This escalated into some pushing between the couple.

At this point Miss Natasha Medforth and her boyfriend Mr Roy Mekay intervened and tried to calm them both down. Mr Stewart slapped Mr Mckay in the face. Mr Mckay did not respond which only incensed Mr Stewart further, whereupon the police arrived and arrested him.

Mr Stewart then managed to assault another neighbour before police had him under control.

In mitigation, Mr Ian Warburton said that although his client was an, "habitual offender," he was, "...very remorseful of his actions."

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds sentenced Mr Stewart to one month in custody but said that upon completion of the prison term he must seek the help of the Social Work department.

She closed by telling Mr Stewart that when he finished his jail sentence, "you must stand on your

own feet."

## No plea from taxi operator to sexual charges

A STANLEY man appeared in court yesterday to face several charges under the Sexual Offences Act, to which he entered no plea.

Brian John Williams was granted bail, subject to a number of conditions, one of those being that he may not be alone in a taxi with any female under the age of 18 as long as the condition remains in force. Mr Williams currently operates the taxi firm BK Cabs.

## **Liberation Day 2005:**

ISLANDERS have gathered to commemorate their liberation from Argentine occupation in 1982.

The commemorations of Liberation Day, June 14, began with a service in Christ Church Cathedral.

As with every year since 1982, the church was full for the service which included Bible readings from His Excellency the Governor, a senior representative of the Royal Navy, the British Forces Chief of Staff and student Nadia Smith, representing the Falklands community.

The service, which was transmitted live by the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station featured a number of hymns and a short sermon by Ken Newton of the Tabernacle.

The congregation then moved to the Liberation Monument on Ross Road to be joined by a large crowd for a ceremony which involved an Act of Remembrance and the laying of wreaths.

Following the arrival at the memorial of His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce, and the Commander of British Forces. Commodore Ian Moncrieff, the service of remembrance began.

Prayers were followed by *The Last Post* which marked the beginning of two minutes' silence. *Reveille* was then played. Stanley's Paul Freer and RAF policeman Ian Yardley provided the musical accom-

paniment to the service

Detachments from the tri-services were all on parade, along with the Falkland Islands Defence Force.

Wreaths were laid on behalf of a number of organisations including the Royal British Legion, the Falkland Islands Government and the South Atlantic Medal Association (SAMA82). Governor Pearce laid a civic wreath of poppies on behalf of Her Majesty the Oueen.

Her Majesty the Queen.
Two visiting Welsh Guards veterans and a veteran from 3Para all laid wreaths on the memorial.

The memorial service was followed by a civic reception in the Falkland Islands Defence Force club.

Gary Clement, Chairman of the Falklands branch of SAMA 82 thanked the organisers of both the Landing Day service at San Carlos on May 21 and the "excellent parade and act of remembrance held on June 14"

He added that he was grateful for fundraising events held in aid of SAMA82 which have taken place in recent weeks in the Victory Bar, and the Globe Tavem and a quiz held by Nikki Morrison in conjunction with the Stanley Arms last weekend

Mr Clement said he had received several Liberation Day e-mails from Falklands War veterans, "...wishing the people of the Falklands their good will."

## A diverse future for racecourse?

I BELIEVE it is important that the Stanley Racecourse is preserved, as a centre for entertainment for future generations.

At the same time, I feel to justify this, we need to look seriously at how the facility is used.

Whatever the future plans for the racecourse are, it will inevitably cost money to repair or to make changes to the existing facility but this will always be a drop in the ocean, in comparison to the cost of relocating the racecourse to another site.

To my mind the Stanley Racecourse needs to be more than just a venue for horse racing at Christmas time: we need to think of it as more of a place for entertainment for the whole community, with perhaps the horse racing being the main event with other activities included.

I was involved with the Stanley Sports Association for a number of years and the Committee at that time realised we had to find other ways to entertain people and make more use of the facility, in order to justify its existence. As a result of this we organised the first fun day, which was a great success, as have been similar events organised at the racecourse since. The great thing about this type of event is that more people can become involved, as well as being entertained.

I believe that with a few changes to the existing facility there is no reason why a fun day, summer fair or any other event could not be run at Christmas in conjunction with the horse racing.

If the stables were on the south side of the racecourse, this would then free up all the ground on the north side for other activities over the Christmas period and throughout the year. I presume that it would also be far safer for jockeys and horses reining up on the incline on the south side as opposed to the present system. Flaving the stables on the south side would also mean that spectators would be well away from the horses and jockeys when they leave for and return from a race, which has been a concern for safety reasons for some time.

Also, if these new stables were to back out onto Sappers Hill, which is common ground, it would allow the SSA to rent them out to horse owners when not in use, to

help boost funds.

The ground and the old stables on the north side could then be used for livestock shows and other activities during the year. Also, as there are a number of other buildings at the racecourse, two of which are bars that, as far as I am aware, stand empty for most of the year, there is the potential for a number of small clubs to spring up and take advantage of the spare ground that now would not be disturbed by horses.

If some of this ground were to be worked up, perhaps bowls, croquet, archery or even a putting green could be considered.

Most of these activities could be run safely alongside horse racing, hopefully making far better use of the whole area and in doing so helping to secure the site for public entertainment for many years to come.

I appreciate that to make changes to the present layout at the racecourse would cost money, but the more people it benefits, the easier it is to justify when looking for funding.

## Your questions answered

O WHAT was the total cost involved in the Saladero Goat Herd from the beginning of the venture to the recent sale of the herd? And what was the total money realised in the recent sale by tender of the Saladero Goat Herd?

 ${f A}$  Semor Agricultural Advisor Neil Judd provided Penguin News with this response

The goat herd was established at Saladero in late 1999 as a continuation of an earlier FIDC project to evaluate the economic and logistical merit of running goats in the Falkland Islands.

Since this time approximately £6500 has been spent on improving the genetic integrity and goat meat productivity of the animals.

Since 1999, entire males (bucks) have been provided to five Falkland Island farms with goat enterprises. In addition 293 animals have been provided to "Wineglass Sta-tion" and "Wreck Point Farm" in accord with contracts established in

The decision was made in early 2005 to disperse the goat herd to private enterprise through a sale by tender process. The sale realised the sum of £1125

HOW many people in Stanley earn £12,000 or less per annum?

A Our thanks to Taxation Officer Ken Eccles for the following response.

In responding to this question I have assumed that the word "earns" means "salary" paid to people in employment and does not refer to self-employed business owners.

To try to get the most up to date information possible I have used the earnings being received by everyone in Stanley in the current tax year, to arrive at a total salary figure for the year.

As there are people who have more than one employment I have calculated their total earnings for the year from all employments when considering if they earn more or less than £12000 per annum.

There are currently 1237 people who have one or more employments in Stanley. Of that total 426 will earn £12000 or less in 2005.

THE Falkland Islands woolmark has received a ringing endorsement from craft workers across the

At a recent meeting knitters, felters, spinners and weavers agreed that the label, which was trialled this season, is helping to distinguish Falklands woollen products to tourists, making them a more attractive buy.

As well as the woolmark itself. a range of additional labels have been attached to goods to tell buyers more about the way they were made. At the producers' request, the information on the labels could now be gathered together in a promotional leaflet to be packed with goods at the counter. The leaslet could also be used for more general promotion of Falklands woollen products.

The Falkland Islands Development Corporation, which has supported the labelling trial, agreed to drast a template of the leastlet for producers' comments. FIDC's

Woolmark will work' say craftspeople Fiona Didlick said: "The producers and retailers have been driving this scheme, and we agree with them that producing a leaflet could be an effective way to build on what we've already achieved with labelling. We hope it will help spread the word about Falklands wool, as well as giving shoppers added value.

There are also plans to design a good quality, eye-catching carrier bag for local woollen goods. which could be used by any producer or retailer. The bag would act as an advertisement as well as being an attractive item in itself.

A number of wool producers at the meeting said they wanted to improve their own packaging and labelling, and FIDC agreed to look at how assistance might be given.





## 'Landmine swap shop' for Falklands?

THE Falklands is to back a plan by the charity Landmine Action which proposes that, instead of clearing mines from the Islands, the British government instead removes mines from an equivalent land area in a higher risk country.

Britain is obliged, under the Ottawa convention, to clear the mines in the Falklands, laid during the 1982 war, by March 2009.

However, the Guardian has reported, at a meeting of the standing committees of the Ottowa Convention in Geneva this week, the proposal of clearing an alternative area to the Falklands is to be presented.

In an interview with the Guardian published at the weekend. Islanders said they would be "embarrassed" if the money were spent on clearing mines in the Falklands when there is a need for it elsewhere in the world.

The article quotes Councillor Mike Summers: "There are a lot of mines in the Falklands, but they are not that intrusive. Clearly there is an issue about clearance, but unless they are cleared 110% we are not going to take the fences down anyway. If that can be done, then fine.

"If the British government was to invest money in clearing mines then we would be more than happy for them to invest it in other countries. Our needs are not as pressing as other people's.

"That doesn't mean that in the fullness of time we don't want it done. But we would feel somewhat embarrassed if the British government spent money clearing mines in the Falklands if there was an opportunity to spend it in some other territory where there are children and adults at risk.

"I would back the Falklands initiative absolutely."

The swap initiative is the brainchild of Simon Conway, deputy Director of Landmine Action, who came up with the idea after visiting the Islands in February.

In a statement on the charity's website he said, "Significantly there is no enthusiasm on the part of the Falkland Islanders for clearance. "Reasons given for this include the absence of economic, social and humanitarian impact, the desire to avoid casualties in the clearance process and a lack of confidence that clearance would remove 100% of the mines.

"They have repeatedly asserted that the funds for clearance would be better spent elsewhere, in countries where mines have a significant humanitarian impact. In these circumstances it makes little sense to clear the mines."

However Mr Conway is anxious to avoid providing "the unscrupulous" with a "get out clause": "States Parties are effectively absolved of any responsibility to provide security of person for their populations."

Instead he suggests the "swap shop" option. "In this context - as part of a ten-year deadline extension request - UK could commit to clear an equivalent area of mined land in the most heavily mine affected countries by the initial deadline of March 2009.

"To clear twenty square kilometres of land in Cambodia, Afghanistan or Angola could have a dramatic effect if specifically targeted at those mined areas that sustain the highest number of casualties."

In the Guardian article, Norma Edwards, speaking from her Lake Sulivan farm, said, "My own feeling is that there are places in the world where kids have to walk through minefields and those should be dealt with before us."

"I think it would be an excellent plan to have a sort of landmine swap shop. Put us on the end of the list.

"If you wander into a minefield here you must be a nutter, to be quite honest with you."

## MRSA: not just a 'hospital superbug'

MRSA has recently received a lot of attention and the media often refer to it as the 'hospital

MRSA stands for methicillin resistant staphylococcus aureus and is part of the family of bacteria (germs) known as staphylococcus aureus (SA). SA bacteria can live harmlessly on human skin, but may sometimes cause a number of common infections.

It is found in the nose of 20-40 per cent of normal healthy people and in skin creases.

It does not cause a problem unless it gets into a wound or skin break, when it may cause a simple infection or enter the blood stream. SA is sensitive to, and will be killed by, most commonly used antibiotics

MRSA is a type of SA, which has developed resistance to most antibiotics. It can live harmlessly on the skin and in some chronic wounds such as leg ulcers, but can cause problems if it does get in to a surgical wound or a normally sterile body cavity such as the blad-

MRSA is difficult to treat because there are only a few antibiotics that will kill it

It is a myth to think of MRSA as just a 'hospital superbug'.

MRSA can be caught and passed on anywhere and can be passed from person to person by contact between them.

People usually carry MRSA without ever knowing about it, and it may never cause them a problem. MRSA usually affects elderly people and those with certain long-term health problems. It generally does not harm healthy people including pregnant women. children and babies.

In the very rare instances when MRSA has proved fatal, the person has usually been very ill to begin with and their immune system has been unable to cope with an additional problem.

In hospital

If you are found to have MRSA whilst you are in hospital, you may be moved to a single room. This helps staff to treat you more effectively and protects other pa-

You will be given special shampoo, body wash and cream, and depending on where the infection is, you may be treated with antibiotics

Staff will wear aprons and gloves when they are dealing with you as they must care for other patients in hospital whilst trying to stop cross infection. Visitors will need to wash their hands before and after visiting and will be advised not to touch any wounds that you may have.

You will be tested specifically for MRSA if you are an in-patient at the KEMH, prior to being transferred to another hospital, such as being referred from the KEMH to a hospital in UK.

If you return to the KEMH after receiving treatment in a UK hospital, you will be tested on arrival, and may be kept in a single room until test results are available showing a negative result. This is to stop the spread of MRSA

Staff will explain to you and your relatives what is happening and will be able to answer any of your questions. Remember, the only stupid question is the one that is left unasked.

At home

When you are discharged home from hospital, you may need to carry on with your treatment. Hospital staff will explain carefully how this should be carried out, and in some instances arrange for the district nurse to visit at home. However, this should not restrict your normal life and you will be able to work and socialise as usual.

To prevent the spread of MRSA and to help prevent recurrence, some simple hand-washing rules are the best line of defence.

Remember to wash hands: after using the toilet or blow-

ing your nose before and after dealing with a wound

before and after assisting with personal care for any other member of your family

after you do household tasks such as cleaning

before eating or drinking, or preparing food.

As a visitor

If you are visiting a member of family or a friend in hospital, there are a number of things you can do to help prevent cross infection. including the spread of MRSA.

Check with the nurse in charge before visiting

Wash your hands before entering the ward

Wear clean clothes

Do not sit on the bed or use the patient's toilets

Do not visit if you are feeling unwell

Limit the amount of gifts that may cause clutter and make cleaning difficult

Check what kinds of gifts or food is appropriate

Do not touch any drips. equipment, or your relative/ friend's wound

Talk to the nurse in charge if you have any concerns at all.

#### Serves 12 Ingredients

- I cup finely chopped celery
- I cup finely chopped carrot
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 2 quarts chicken stock
- I cup all-purpose flour I cup butter or margarine, melted
- 8 oz beer or ale
- 16 oz cheddar cheese, grated

#### Method

Boil the celery, carrot and onion in stock until almost tender. for about 10 minutes.

Mix flour and butter, stir in

Cook and stir until thickened. boil for I minute. Reduce heat, add beer and cheese. Mix until smooth and cheese melts.

Heat just to serving temperature

#### Serves 4 - 6 Ingredients:

- I to 1- 1/2lb, stew meat
- I can beer (any kind)
- I can mushroom soup
- 4 carrots, quartered
- 4 stalks celery, quartered
- 3 onions, quartered
- 8 oz. fresh mushrooms, sliced
- 4 potatoes, quartered
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- Flour, to desired thickness.

Mix salt, pepper and flour. Add stew meat. Saute stew meat in a little oil in large soup pot.

Add beer and canned soup. Stir. Add veggies and remaining ingredients.

Cook until meat is tender and veggies are done, approximately 2-3 hours.

## Wool report - week ending June 10 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

Auctuations throughout the world once again had a significant impact on wool prices

In New Zealand and Australia greasy wool prices were reported

However, the strengthening of their currencies against the pound sterling during the week means that. in reality, wool prices were up for most micron categories.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" price increases were of magnitude 0 to 3 p/kg clean for fleece wool lots between 21 and 32 micron and continue to build on steady increases observed over the last six weeks or so.

Ten buyers purchased over 60% of the Australian offering. Modiano Wool and Chargeurs, topmakers of importance to Falkland Island farmers, were once again very active in the worlds wool markets. Collectively they purchased over 3,300 bales from the Australian offering.

Premium and discount rates remained relatively constant during the week Very tender, finer micron, fleece wool lots were dis-counted in the markets by 8 to 15 p/kg clean compared to sound lots. while style, staple length, colour and vegetable matter contamination remained as important issues affect-

ing sale price World markets do not often show characteristics that actually achieve measured market premiums for farmers selling wool (usually quote discounts but also refer to premiums). However, it is possible that farmers in the Falkland Islands are gaining a premium for some of their wool. Farmers are often advised of the value of their high yielding. very low VM wool to specialist markets. It would be useful for farmers to request details from their selling agents as to yield and VM levels required to meet such markets (i.e. what minimum yield and what maximum VM % is permissible), the magnitude of premiums paid and the volume of wool required by such specialist markets

It would be advantageous to be able to quantify the existence of such premiums and observe their im-pact on overall farm incomes. Such knowledge would open the possibility for farmers to strategically man-age their sheep at key periods dur-ing the year and also possibly their wool sales to achieve the requirements of such markets and gain the benefit of the premiums if they ex-

In Australia 84.5% of the 34,995 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 3,899 bales of crossbred wool of which 93.4% was sold. Approximately 30% of the New Zealand offering was not sold.

Auctions continue next week in South Africa and Australia where approximately 61,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale

## Falklands/Malvinas route naming 'a delicate issue'

LAN CHILE has admitted that naming of the Falklands route is "a delicate issue" because both Britain and Argentina are insistent.

But what really matters is that in a global world is. "...we must learn to incorporate the different country codes and that takes time. Ignacio Cueto, Lan's passenger transport general manager, has said.

In an interview published on Sunday in Santiago's EL Mercurio. Mr Cueto admitted there was controversy over the route which flies to the Falklands, adding that "the British don't like us calling the Islands Malvinas. But what is important is that these experiences have helped us to learn that there's no internationalization without integration.

In the interview, Mr Cueto expands on Lan Chile's recent experience in the Argentine market where it began domestic flights last week in association with Argentine partners, but has been under constant "unfair attacks" from its main competitor. Spanish owned Aerolineas Argentinas.

Furthermore Mr Cueto complains that Lan in Argentina

has been facing constant labour strife, criticisms from local competitors and, lately, bureaucratic inconveniences for the registry of

The mediatic attack we have suffered is most unfortunate and unfair. Yes, they accuse us of being Chileans and it's true that 49% of Lan Argentina is Chilean, and we are proud of it." said Mr Cueto who added that competing Aerolineas Argentinas which belongs to the Spanish group Marsans, published on inauguration day an ironic full page ad in Argentina's main newspapers congratulating Lan "for flying with

When asked specifically if he identified an "anti Chilean attitude" in Argentina, Mr Cueto pointed his guns directly at Antonio Mata, Aerolineas Argentinas CEO

"lt's a paradoxical situation since the opposition we are finding is clearly headed by Spanish controlled Aerolineas and their CEO who is also Spanish," said Mr Cueto.

"We don't criticise their Spanish influence or the fact that they already operate in Chile through

Aerolineas del Sur; we only demand from the authorities reciprocity, and as they have been licenced to fly in Chile, we can also have the same rights to fly in Argentina," said Mr Cueto.

Mr Mata in several interviews accused LanChile of referring to the Islands as Falklands instead of Malvinas

Lan, which has the goal of becoming the top line in the region and one of the ten leading in the world, "must first ensure its presence in Argentina and Brazil.

"Brazil is very important; so far we've given a bite to the Argentine market, a market where we have targeted a significant share. Our objective is 15% of domestic traffic this year and 30% in 2006. confessed Mr Cueto.

However Mr Cueto said that much will depend on how the government administers air rates in the domestic market.

"I believe that as competition improves, the government will be addressing the rates scale which currently has much to do with the dominating position of Aerolineas Argentinas," said Mr Cueto.

#### EU-Mercosur trade talks

PORTUGAL and Spain called yesterday for more political input in the EU's trade negotiations with the Mercosur bloc, after five-year talks broke down.

The negotiations between the EU and Argentina, Brazil, Paraguay and Uruguay started in 1999.

Talks collapsed in October, with both sides accusing each other of failing to open key and sensitive market sectors.

Portugal's Foreign Minister Diogo Freitas do Amaral has blamed the collapse of talks on bureaucratic procedures at the European Headquarters in Brus-

On yesterday, he and Spanish Foreign Minister Miguel Morantinos sent a letter to the Mercosur nations, saying "we give great importance to the conclusion of an agreement between the EU and Mercosur.

Given the impasse, however. we cannot look at this agreement only from an economic perspective. We need to underline its po-litical dimension," the letter said.

The letter also said the issue should be discussed further at a meeting in September in New York during the United Nations summit.

## 'Waxy' fuel no longer

THE Falklands' fuel supplier says engine problems experienced by a number of motorists over the past fortnight is due to the mixture of cold weather additive in its diesel, not dirty fuel.

According to Stanley Services Ltd. a shipment of diesel fuel was received in April with a pour point of -15C. Cold weather additive was mixed with it and a quantity of kerosene added and. ". tests indicated the pour point had increased to -27C."

However, it was discovered during the recent cold spell that, "... due to the high wax content in the fuel." the cold weather additive has not worked to its full effect and problems with choking filters were encountered. A number of motorists suffered breakdowns as a result

Robert Rowlands of Stanley Services Ltd said this is the first time since 1993 that cold weather has caused major difficulties with diesel fuel.

At times air temperatures have been as low as -6C at Mount Pleasant and with chill factor this could equate to as low as -20C, while other locations have recorded even lower temperatures.

Mr Rowlands said a further stock of diesel fuel has been received from Russia with a superior cold weather performance and is now being issued.

He said, "...this grade is expected to cope with typical Falkland winter temperatures encountered."

## Flight safety award for agent

A TRAVEL agent who spotted an open panel on an aircraft which was about to take off from Mount Pleasant Airport (MPA) and raised the alarm has been praised for his "moral courage".

Bruce Wilks of International Tours and Travel Ltd yesterday received a commendation from Royal Air Force Strike Command for his actions which Squadron Leader Graham Clark of Flight Safety at MPA believes. "...would have prevented a potentially serious inci-

Mr Wilks was on duty as Lan ground staff on October 23, 2004 to meet the scheduled commercial fight from Chile.

The arrival and turn round of the flight appeared to be uneventful, however, as the aircraft taxied out for its return flight to Chile. Mr Wilks spotted an open panel towards the rear of the aircraft on the right side of the fuselage.

He informed one of the two Royal Air Force airmen who were assisting with the aircraft handling and the airman immediately reported the open panel to the Air Traffic Control Tower

Traffic Control Tower
Air Traffic Control stopped the aircraft before take off on the end of the runway and a crewmember

disembarked to inspect the open panel. After inspection the panel was deemed secure by the crew of the aircraft and the flight was recleared for take off by Air Traffic Control. The subsequent take off went smoothly.

According to the citation from the Chief of Staff, subsequent investigation revealed that the panel was probably the intake for the Ram Auxiliary Turbine. "...however, this might not have been so and I believe the prompt and professional actions taken by Mr Wilks and the airman would have prevented a potentially serious flight safety incident."

Before presenting Mr Wilks with his award at the International Tours and Travel Ltd office yesterday, Commander of British Forces. Commodore Ian Moncrieff, said, "Flight safety is a big thing to us," and commended the "moral courage" of Mr Wilks, "...to say something didn't look right."

lle added. "I like this kind of paperwork. What I don't like is paperwork for boards of enquiry into crashes."

He said he hoped Mr Wilks' example will. "encourage other people to come forward if they see something that might not be right."

## July 10 remembrance

THE Falkland Islands are to commemorate the 60th Anniversary of the end of the Second World War

It was announced by the Royal British Legion in the Islands this week that the Falklands will join the UK on Sunday, July 10 for a day of remembrance.

The aim of the July 10 commemoration which falls between VE Day on May 8, and VJ Day on August 15, is to remember all theatres of war in the 1939-45 conflict and everyone who took part

A service of commemoration will be held at Christ Church Cathedral at 10am at which His Excellency the Governor, the Commander of British Forces and veterans of the war will be present. This will be followed by a public reception hosted by the Governor at the FIDF Hall from 11am to 12.30pm, to which all members of the Falkland Islands Community are invited.

The Governor will then host a lunch for veterans at Government House, at which attendance is by invitation only. It will be appropriate for medals and decorations to be

worn to these events.

Chairman of the Falkland Islands Branch of the Royal British Legion, Michael Stevens stressed this is an event to honour the veterans and he appealed to all veterans who served in the Second World War, "whether in the ambulance service, as nurses, merchant seamen, or in the forces," to make themselves known to him, "...so we can have them hosted by the governor."

He said it is important that everybody who participated in World War II, whether in the Falklands or other theatres of war, receives an invitation to take part in the July 10 events. Mr Stevens can be contacted on telephone 21936

ON TUESDAY evening I had the debatable pleasure of attending my very first public meeting in the Court and Council Chambers. For those of you who have never attended one, allow me to set the scene.

The same (I am reliably informed) thirty or so members of the public gather to face the five elected members currently in the Islands. The meeting is declared open and then . . . silence. It reminded me of being back at school when no one wanted to be the first to speak. Eventually someone does ask a question and now it is the turn of councillors to look like children in a school room, heads down, no eye contact made lest they be the unlucky one picked on to attempt to answer the question. An answer of sorts is offered, usually including promises to bring the subject up at GPC, and then the whole uncomfortable process begins again.

Political apathy is the subject of much discussion in the UK at the moment with voter turnout at the recent General Election just over 60%.

despite the hugely contentious issue of the war in Iraq.

In the last General Election here in the Falklands, the average voter turnout for Stanley and Camp was over 75%. Political discussion and debate is widespread among the community as the letters page in Penguin News often testifies - we are lucky in that apathy is not a problem we face

How then, is it the case, that in a well informed and politically active society such as ours, the one opportunity to question the decision makers directly and hold them accountable, is so poorly attended and almost excruciating in its execution?

It cannot be that people don't care, so perhaps it is time to look at the

format of the meetings

A member of the public at the meeting on Tuesday suggested that each month one of the Councillors might begin the meeting by giving a short presentation, perhaps fifteen minutes in length, outlining plans or progress made on a certain subject, relevant to their portfolio. Not only would this encourage more people to attend to find out what is happening within government but it would also no doubt lead to the topics being discussed and follow-on questions asked.

A more radical approach might be to change the way the meeting is

At present one of the councillors chairs the meeting but perhaps it would be more effective to have someone who is not a councillor, someone neutral. akin to a speaker, to control the meeting, select questioners from the floor and then address the relevant councillor to reply, based on which portfolio they hold. Other members would of course also be free to add to their colleagues' answers on any subject they wished.

Whether any changes to the format of public meetings is made or not, it seems a shame that what should be a workable, effective asset to our democratic process is so underutilised, ineffective and seemingly irrelevant to the

majority of the population.

# When will we get permanent dentists?

HOW long will it be until we get two permanent dentists?

That question was put to councillors on Tuesday evening.

Councillors were also asked about the loss from the hospital staff of Dr Bernadette Paver who recently told Penguin News she had left due to

"pay inequalities".
One person said, "We've got doctors who want to live here. Why not give them more money to keep

them here?

Councillor Cheek said the issue of pay for doctors and other professionals is currently "under review."

The panel declined to discuss Dr Paver's personal circumstances.

Another member of the public said there seemed to be no value of staff who wish to stay in the Islands at the end of contracts and added that greater focus is needed on retraining programmes and allowing

Councillor Check said the government spends a lot of the training budget on keep people's qualifica-tions up to date and that given sufficient notice, sabbaticals could be arranged. She admitted the government is. "...not doing all we could," however she added, "sometimes people get impatient and sometimes they no longer have the skills we require.

She also reminded the meeting of the financial implications of work-

ers taking sabbaticals.

# Translation at root of misunderstanding

COUNCILLORS have been quizzed about how the Falklands speakers at the Committee on Decolonisation last week managed to insult the Argentine Foreign Minister.

A member of the public said there appeared to have been a gap between what Councillor Birmingham reported he and Councillor Luxton had said and what the Argentine delegation had understood.

Foreign Minister Rafael Bielsa was reported to have become angry at the meeting and thumped a table as he felt the Falklands speakers had compared the current Argentine govemment to the military juntas of the 1970s and 1980s.

Councillor Birmingham told Penguin News he believed there may

have been a problem with transla-

According to an article in La Nacion this week, the confusion appears to have grown from the trans-

lation of the word "bully".
The paper said. "The translation, distributed immediately by the Argentine foreign ministry, was attributed to UN interpreters. The word "maton" is akin to "killers" rather than the British understanding of bully.

Councillor Cheek said the text of the speeches is available to the public and she did not believe they had

"seemed provocative."

She added. "...I don't pretend to understand the Argentine psyche.

# Shortage of tradespeople forecast for Falklands

THE Falkland Islands need more young people to take on careers in trades.

In response to a question from Penguin News as to the level of young people taking on apprenticeships, Councillor Richard Cockwell said he was concerned, "...we've concentrated on academic qualifications

rather than on skills."

He said, "While not wishing to denigrate academics, we need to encourage craftsman and remind people it's just as honourable a profes-

Councillor Cheek said that although training is available, which involves work locally and in the United Kingdom, she had her doubts

that the Falklands will have enough plumbers, electricians and carpenters in future.

Councillor Roger Edwards said he had raised the issue with the Director of Education who said the trades are encouraged at school with tradesmen visiting the Community School to give an insight into their work.

A member of the public suggested that instead of taking professionals to schools, students should become more involved in the workplace. He said, "Youngsters don't relate to tradesmen in a classroom - we need to get them to show the trades in action, in their working environ-

# 'Disgraceful' MPA Road: clay tillite blamed

THE road from Stanley to Mount Pleasant is in a "disgraceful" condition, members of the public have told councillors.

One man said a particular section has a "deplorable level of mire on it" which can pull vehicles to the side of the hazardous road.

Holder of the Public Works portfolio, Councillor Roger Edwards said, the theory is, we are now using the best option and the best material for the road." He said the bad section of the road featured a type of tillite rock which had too high a clay content, and therefore the department were now mining deeper in the quarry to gain a better material.

Another member of the public asked if the money used to maintain the road could be used for a tarmac programme however the panel of councillors said this was not possi-

Councillors were told that "concrete is the way to go", based on a decision by Chileans to lay a con-crete, not tarmac, on "long expanses of road" such as that from the Punta Arenas airport into the city itself.

# RBA Chairman defends killing cattle

THE Chairman of the Rural Business Association (RBA) says his decision to destroy sixteen of his farm's weaner heifers was a difficult one but necessary due to the cost of keeping the animals alive.

Penguin News contacted Paul Robertson at his Port Stephens home following allegations that he had shot the cattle after FIMCo failed to offer a high enough price for his animals. This Mr Robertson says. "...is only half the story."

A few years ago he made the decision to sell his cattle as weaners, "primarily with the transport limitations in mind" and for a while, he says, the system worked well for him.

However, he says, "The warning signs that the industry was in trouble/at a crossroads were there a whole year ago when I was unable to sell my weaner steers.

"That of course didn't stop my cows producing sixty six calves last spring, which all of a sudden meant I had a lot of animals, but as a consequence I did take the decision not to join my cows this year."

This meant that, apart from breeding stock and a few older steers for his family's consumption. "...the oldest animals! would have for disposal are eighteen months old and are not yet beef material, and so I have never tried selling them through FIMCo."

On May 25, Mr Robertson shot eight breeding cows of differing ages. "... which although I took no pleasure from was a pretty straight forward decision. While there was nothing wrong with them per se, selection is part and parcel of farming."

FIMCo offer£100 for cull cows and. Mr Robertson said, "it is fair to question if the economics and logistics make it worthwhile, especially from West Falklands," however this is not why he shot these eight animals.

"These cows had just successfully reared a calf through a summer of drought and were in no fit state to be offered for sale, so no approach was made to FIMCo or anyone else."

On May 31, Mr Robertson made the "harder decision" to destroy sixteen weaner heifers, a move which has sparked debate in many corners of the Islands.

Mr Robertson said he was simply unable to accommodate these animals through the winter. "...and, with not much likelihood of moving them on later in the year, it seemed to me the only available option, unfortunate as it was.

"I may well have been able to give them away but that would in my view have been detrimental to the industry and its present prob-

Some readers may be surprised to find Mr Robertson is a member of the board of FIMCo and, therefore, was involved when the price offered for cattle was set.

However he says, "It's new ground, those prices aren't necessarily cast in stone, and may or may not make economic sense to me as a farmer but I believe that if we want to grow the market we must, along with quality and consistency, become more competitive – and that may mean having to accept less for beef animals than some farmers are used to getting."

As to the message his actions could have sent to members of the RBA? Mr Robertson simply says. "There are problems with the industry, not least of which is getting animals from the West to market, and which most interested parties are trying to work through but it will be a long, slow process. Times are tough. I can't really see how it can be construed otherwise."

He continues. "This farm, like all other farms, can ill afford the loss of revenue from actions such as mine but we are at the stage where the cattle are costing us money in grazing fees and the costs associated with just keeping them alive, and with the market confused or non-existent!"

Mr Robertson now has a herd of approximately 170 cattle. He says, "I would dearly love to find a home for the 85 young animals soon, failing that I will grow them out and attempt to sell them as beef a year or two down the line.

"I have 72 proven breeding cows which I am happy with and will use as a pasture improvement tool until such time that I feel I can mate them again."

# New MoD shipping set up for FIC

THE Falkland Islands Company (FIC) has announced it will no longer bring its own charter boats to the Falklands, opting instead to join the MoD's chiening actuals.

join the MoD's shipping service.

In an effort to "combat the impacts of escalating fuel and charter costs on freight rates" and to "improve the frequency and regularity of service provided to their customers", the FIC's shipping subsidiary Darwin Shipping Ltd will now ship freight to the Islands aboard the Defence Transport and Movements Agency (Ministry of Defence) vessels

Using this service, the company says it will continue to provide its customers with a freight service, a consolidation and containerisation service. "together with bill of lading, customs entry and the necessary freight forwarding documentation for all southbound cargo."

Darwin Shipping and managing agents Exel Freight Management (UK) Ltd will both act as sales agents for this service, "...maintaining independent and competitive sales tariffs to their customers"

The company says it is confident that this new venture will provide its customers with. "improved levels of service, underpinned by stability of charges."

Darwin Shipping says it aims to "consolidate and stabilise" its existing freight rates and to hold them at the current levels until the end of December 2006.

For some time, the Darwin Shipping charter vessels have made stops at Fox Bay to deliver freight to West Falklands residents. FIC Director Roger Spink said the MoD vessel will be too large to carry out this task however he has met with Island Shipping, the government's Chief Executive and Councillor Roger Edwards and is hopeful "something can be done to benefit the people on the West."

Exel will continue to act as port and freight handling agents in the UK for all commercial shipments. In the Falklands Islands. Darwin Shipping will act in a similar capacity for all commercial freight.

Some of the FIC's competitors this week expressed concern that the company may have access to supplier details through their position as shippers.

To this Mr Spink responded, any information on shipments

is usually very general and we would think it very difficult for anyone to make meaningful use of!

We already ship freight on Darwin Shipping Ltd for several competitors of FIC who, to the best of my knowledge, have never complained in the recent past or had reason to believe any use was being made (or could be made) of the information obtained by them shipping with us.

"The previous port and handling agents in the Falklands for Exel are competitors of many of the Companies shipping on that service and it did not seem to deter those customers from using that service."

Exel will manage all commercial freight operationally at the Marchwood UK facility and the FIC will undertake the management, handling, distribution and delivery of commercial goods landed at FIPASS in the Falkland Islands. The company says any commercial freight discharged at Mare Harbour will be transported to Stanley overland for distribution from FIPASS.

For northbound movements, all freight for both Darwin Shipping and Exel customers will be managed, assembled and consolidated at FIPASS for loading on the northbound sailings by the FIC, with Exel supporting destination activities at port in the UK.

The company says it intends to make special provision for wool shipments to improve the service levels provided.

"Agreement in principle has been reached for the two northbound sailings scheduled to leave the Falkland Islands in quarter one each year to transport wool, discharging directly at Southampton main port, eliminating the current cost of barging the product across the river from Marchwood."

This, they say, will also provide an entry port for frozen meat products from the abattoir for the Falkland Islands Meat Company.

Darwin Shipping also says the elimination of barging costs for wool across river to Southampton.

...will support the stabilisation of costs to the farming community for the same period."

This new arrangement is intended to commence with the southbound sailing of the MoD vessel due to depart on September 29, 2005



A MAN who assaulted his partner has been fined £250 and bound over for six months.

Barry O'Dean pleaded guilty on Wednesday to assaulting his partner, with whom, the court heard, he has an on-off relationship

The assault was alleged to have taken place on June 2 at the home of Mr O'Dean's partner.

The woman said Mr O'Dean had become agitated and began verbally abusing her before laying on her, biting her hard on the lip and scratching and bruising her buttock

She also alleged that Mr O'Dean had threatened her and her daughter. Mr O'Dean denied biting the woman and said his watch strap may have caught her lip.

His defence lawyer, Richard Marlor, described the assault as "a relatively minor offence" which had grown from frustration at Mr O'Dean's partner's actions and decisions. However, he said his client felt ashamed of his actions and "realises any incident of violence is unacceptable.

He said Mr O'Dean had been provoked by his partner, who he believed had been trying to pick a fight with him, and "boiled over."

In issuing Mr O'Dean with his penalty, the Senior Magistrate, Mrs Clare Faulds, said domestic violence is a serious matter as, "...it is so easy for violence to get out of hand.

Mr O'Dean will also pay £70 prosecution costs.

Also in court on Wednesday was Brian Williams who faces three charges under the Sexual Offences Act.

Mr Williams entered no pleas and his case was adjourned for four weeks.

The charges he faces involve sexual activity in the presence of a person under 16, sexual touching without consent and sexual penetration without consent.

Mr Williams was granted bail, subject to standard and special conditions.

# Domestic incident results in fine West snow drifts cause concern

WHILE the extent of the wintery weather in Stanley has been a few days of snow, it has been rather more extreme on West Falkland with comparisons being made to the extended winter of 1995.

Heavy falls of snow and six foot drifts have caused problems for many farmers and are beginning to take their toll on the livestock.

On Tuesday, James McGhie of Stoney Ridge Farm had only been able to check on his hogget flock where he found sheep stuck in two snow drifts. In one six foot drift, James was only able to save four of the fifteen animals trapped in-

After a foot of snow fell during the night of Saturday, June 12 James said, "I don't think we've ever had so much in one night. People talk about 1995 which was a prolonged winter but this time we had at least a foot overnight. In 1995 I don't think we had that much '

Since the snow fell it has now begun to drift and James said. "The drafting race, which is about waist high, was completely covered and the deepest drift was around nine foot deep.

Although James' fences have fared quite well with only a few broken standards in the settlement. others have not been so fortunate. As reported in last week's Penguin News, Tex and Mandy Alazia of Port Edgar had already lost four miles of fencing due to the build up of ice. They now estimate the total length of fence lost to be nearer eight or ten miles.

With the snow still not thawing, many farmers are still unable to assess the full impact of the bad weather as they cannot reach the furthest areas of their land.

Leon Berntsen of Albermale said, "we still haven't been able to get out around the farm to see the extent of the damage that has been done."

# Chileans refused entry to MPA

A NUMBER of incidents in which Chileans working in the Falklands have been refused entry to Mount Pleasant have led the British Forces at the base to restate its policy of not allowing civilians onto military establishments, "...unless they have been previously authorised to do so.

A number of Chileans working outside Mount Pleasant (MPC) who do not hold Falklands residence have been refused entry to the base in recent weeks, however Chileans with residence appear have been permitted to enter.

Penguin News passed reports of these incidences to the British Forces at Mount Pleasant.

One involved a Chilean man

who had been refused entry while an Australian colleague was permitted on to the base. Neither held Permanent Residence Permits.

Captain Benjy Woolley, Media Officer for the forces, this week commented, "MPC and the Ministry of Defence have a strict policy of not allowing civilian personnel onto a military establishment unless they have been previously authorised to do so.

"The incident involving the Australian civilian who was apparently welcomed onto the camp is being investigated.

He added, "MPC is the proud employer of a number of Chileans, and is always very grateful for the hard work they carry out here.'

# Defence Force team head to Bisley

MEMBERS of the Falkland Islands Defence Force flew out of the Islands yesterday, ready to take part in a military shooting competition.

They are heading to Bisley for a skill at arms competition which begins on Monday

The team, which consists of Major Peter Biggs, Captains Derek Clarke and Andy Brownlee. Corporals Russell Smith and Ian Betts and Privates Dustin Clarke, Daniel Biggs and Geoffrey Loftus, hope to build on the FIDF's good

track record at Bisley.

Kevin Ross, a member of FIDF currently living in the UK will assist the team with their administration

The competition consists of three distinct parts: the Army Rifle Association competition, the Territorial Army Rifle Association and the National Rifle Association Competition

# Veteran's sadness at continuing threat

A VETERAN of the battle of Mt Longdon has expressed his sadness that Argentine pressure on the Falkland Islands has not abated.

In 1982 George Duffus was a platoon sergeant with the support company attached to A Company of the third Battalion, Parachute Regiment.

He describes the Falklands War as "a small part of my life but a big part of it too."

George was in the Islands last week at the invitation of his son, who is serving with the Royal Engineers based at Mount Pleasant. He attended the Liberation Day commemorations and retraced his steps on Mt Longdon. He also visited a number of places he stayed at during 1982 including San Carlos, Teal Inlet and Estancia.

George said the judgement to send the Paras and Royal Marines to fight in the Falklands was the right decision: "We were the right people to get across the terrain," however he says that much of the success of the British Forces is owed to local people for their assistance.

He fondly remembers Mandy McLeod who would bring out a 'dixie' of porridge at first light every day to the men, who were dug in on the old airstrip at Port San Carlos, and Tony and Ailsa Heathman who assisted 3Para with moving ammunition for the battle on Longdon.

He said, "Their knowledge of the terrain and help with vehicles, was of great benefit to the battalion. They were more than willing to do anything for us."

Of the actual battle on the

mountain, in which 23 British soldiers were killed and many more, George simply said, "...we were lucky. B Company took the brunt of the attack."

He described the artillery fire which followed the battle as, "...hellish, all night long, it was so indiscriminate."

George, who left the Parachute Regiment eleven years ago, is now chairman of the 3Para Reunion Club: on Liberation Day he laid a wreath on behalf of the club.

He said he was pleased to have had the chance to spend Liberation Day in the Islands and describes the Falklands as, "...a different place now and I wish every success to the people of the Falklands."

He said his greatest impression from his return visit was that, despite the win of the British Forces in 1982, "...the threat from Argentina hasn't gone away; it's very sad."

# War history: newspapers allege Argentine bias

TWO British newspapers, the Mail on Sunday and the Sunday Express, have carried speculative stories, in advance of publication of the Official History of the Falklands Conflict, saying the book will reveal secret Foreign Office legal advice raising doubts over the legitimacy of British claims on the Islands.

Both newspapers say that revelations in the book will be seized upon by Argentina to intensify its unrelenting campaign to acquire sovereignty over the Islands.

Both newspapers' stories are unfairly imbalanced because neither points out that the legal opinions apparently quoted are considered by the present day Foreign Office to be so old as to be irrelevant and anachronistic in present-day circumstances, taking no account of all that has happened in recent years and of the over-riding importance now attached to the principle of self-determination.

The Mail on Sunday article says there has been "a furious response from Falklands officials" and quotes Councillor Jan Cheek as saying the book will be used by the Argentines as "ammunition for their claims". It also quotes what it calls a highly placed source in Britain as saying: "The professor did not seem to appreciate that the Falklands is a continuing dispute and that whatever he wrote would have a direct political impact".

It also quotes former Falklands Government Chief Secretary in 1982, Dick Baker, as saying he views the forthcoming publication with "trepidation" and questions its accuracy

The Sunday Express article says, "the book hurts diplomatic efforts as Argentinian Minister attacks Islanders". a reference to repetitious criticism by the Argentine Foreign Minister. Rafael Bielsa, at the United Nations and elsewhere.

Neither newspaper outlines the British case for sovereignty. Whatever interpretation Professor Freedman's official history may make, both the United Kingdom and Falkland Islands Governments have no doubt over Britain's sovereignty, strongly reiterated by the Prime Minister, Mr Tony Blair, a few months ago. In a message to the Islanders. Mr Blair declared: "Let me assure you that there is no lessening in our commitment to your security, sovereignty or right to self-determination. We have no doubts about our sovereignty over the Falkland Islands, South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands and their surrounding maritime areas'

Whatever earlier Foreign Office legal views may be quoted, the Foreign Office now bases Britain's case for retention of sovereignty on nearly two centuries of British settlement

The Foreign and Commonwealth Office declares: "With the exception of two months of illegal occupation in 1982 (following the Argentine invasion), the Falkland Islands have been continuously, peacefully and effectively occupied and administered by Britain since 1833".

# New BAS vehicle unveiled 'Captain Harvey' joins Dumbarton Castle

AN INNOVATIVE concept for an Antarctic vehicle is unveiled this week at the Royal College of Art's final year show.

Working closely with experts from the British Antarctic Survey (BAS), award-winning designer James Moon has come up with a lightweight, compact eco-friendly vehicle for use in one of the Earth's most extreme environments.

The vehicle, called "Ninety Degrees South", uses novel technology to keep drivers safe, warm and protected from the high levels UV exposure that occur under the Antarctic ozone hole Designed to fit into the small Twin Otter aircraft that BAS use for working in remote deep field locations. Moon's two-person vehicle has a combination of tracks and wheels allow it to operate anywhere on the continent over hard ground. snow or ice surfaces.

The designer believes the versatility of his concept vehicle has commercial potential.

He says, "The challenge was to design an environmentallyfriendly vehicle specifically for Antarctica that could be used also in other cold regions.

"I'm particularly interested in overcoming the dangers of travelling across crevassed areas of ice. Unknown terrain limits the speed of any journey over the ice - the faster you can detect crevasses the quicker you can travel. I'm using unmanned pathfinder technology

which travels on a GPS controlled route ahead of the main unit


The pathfinder is secured by a 30m umbilical cord, and uses ground-penetrating radar to assess risk. I believe this technology serves as a prototype for future. entirely automated, expeditions in the Antarctic and on other plancts

David Blake, British Antarctic Survey Head of Technology and Engineering says, "The large tracked vehicles (Snocats) and snowmobiles we use have been developed over several years and work reliably in the extreme Antarctic environment, supporting our field and base operations.

"James Moon's concept is very novel and a vehicle built to his design could enable new areas of activity to be undertaken in Antarctica, including ground based deep field surveys. I am sure that should the vehicle be developed, it could also be used as a personnel carrier in Arctic regions. James's vehicle is innovative and challenging and I am delighted at his enthusiasm and drive in developing his concept vehicle.

# Low back pain: causes and treatment

LOW back pain is very common. Nine out of ten people will suffer at some stage in their life.

Thankfully, most episodes of low back pain are self-limiting and will sort themselves out within a few days or weeks. However. there are certain things you can do to help or hinder recovery.

Symptoms

Low back pain is an ache or pain in the lower part of the spine and possibly into the leg. If it is combined with pain down the leg travelling to below the knee this is known as sciatica, after the main nerve (the sciatic nerve), which travels at the back of the leg

About 19 in 20 cases of acute back pain are classed as simple 'mechanical' backache. Simple doesn't mean that there is only little pain, the pain can range from mild to severe. Pain might be worse on bending or sitting, especially in an easy chair. Coughing or sneezing often aggravates symptoms and the muscles of the back may go into spasm.

Red flags

'Red flags' are warning signs. which may point to something more serious than simple mechanical low back pain.

If you experience any of these you should contact your doctor or physiotherapist soon:

You are younger than 20 or older than 55 when you get back pain for the first time

The pain starts after a violent injury like a car crash

The pain is constant and getting worse

You have or have had cancer You are on oral steroids

You are generally unwell in yourself or are losing weight You are experiencing weakness

of any muscles in the leg or foot You experience problems with your bladder or bowels.

You should also consult a doctor or physiotherapist if the pain continues for more than 4-6 weeks.

Although low back pain may come on suddenly, the cause is often long-standing. The most common causes are a sedentary occupation (prolonged sitting or driving), poor control of movement due to muscle weakness of stomach and back muscles, doing an unusual heavy activity (i.e. have an office job and being very unfit and then lifting paving slabs all weekend).

Often the exact site of the pain is not clear, it can be a sprain or minor tear of a muscle or ligament around the spine, a problem with the disc or the small 'facet' joint between the vertebrae.

Treatment

No two back problems are the same so the following are just guidelines and will help in the majority of people.

1. As a rule, continue with normal activities as much as possible. Don't do anything which aggravates your symptoms dramatically or makes them spread further away from your spine towards your limbs.

But you will have to expect some discomfort when you are trying to keep as active as possible.

2. Avoid sitting for prolonged periods of time and use by preference a straight chair.

Don't put your feet in front of you on a stool and avoid easy chairs or sofas. If sitting is very

uncomfortable you could kneel at the table to eat or perch on the edge of a chair with your knees bent under you.

3. Avoid driving if possible. If you have to drive put the back of your seat upright and use a lumbar roll or a rolled up towel in the small of your back.

It is better to be a passenger than to drive yourself.

4. Try to lie on your front propped up on your elbows.

5. If all movements are agony, lie on your back with a couple of pillows under your knees or lie on your pain free side (if you have one) with the top leg placed slightly forward and supported on a pillow.

Do not do this for more then two days! If it is still painful after this time you are better to try to get up and move around.

6. Take some painkillers or antiinflammatories and use a heat pad. hot water bottle or try an ice-pack (or bag of frozen peas). Either can

# Winter Recipes for the Falkland Islands Classic Chicken Soup

Ingredients

I tablespoon olive oil

I small onion, finely chopped 2 medium carrots, cut into 1/4inch-thick slices

2 medium celery stalks, cut into

1/4-inch-thick slices 29 ounces chicken stock,

skimmed of fat 1/8 teaspoon ground black pep-

2 medium skinless, boneless chicken-breast halves (10 ounces).

## Method

In a saucepan, heat oil over medium heat. Add onion and cook until tender and lightly browned, about 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Add carrots, celery, chicken stock, pepper, and 3 cups water; heat to boiling over high heat. Add chicken to saucepan and reduce heat to low. Cover saucepan and simmer for 8 to 10 minutes, until chicken just loses its pink colour throughout and carrots and celery are tender. Remove saucepan from

Using slotted spoon or tongs. remove chicken from saucepan to plate; cool slightly until easy to handle. With fingers, pull chicken into shreds.

Return chicken to soup; heat through.

# Garlic Butter Chicken Strips

Ingredients

1 lb chicken strips

2 loz sticks butter 14oz chicken stock

1 whole head of garlic or 3 to 4

tablespoons chopped garlic from the jar

I cup flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

Add one stick butter and garlic to the chicken stock in a medium

Bring to a boil, turn down to a simmer and cook for 10 to 15 min-

Mix flour with salt and pepper and coat chicken strips a few pieces at a time.

Melt remaining stick of butter in a skillet and brown the chicken strips on both sides.

Put chicken strips in a casserole dish.

Add chicken stock mixture to the skillet; bring to a boil and simmer for a few minutes.

Pour over chicken in casserole dish and cook in a 350 degree oven for 30 minutes.

Serve over hot cooked rice. Serves 4.

# Wool report - week ending June 17

CURRENCY rates remained relatively stable last week with the UK £ continuing to trade at approximately £1 to \$2.37 Australian for much of the week

Wool prices for fleece wool lots between 22 and 32 micron were either firm in value (up I to 2 p/kg clean) or steady, at sales in Australia last week

Very fine lots however, fell in value quite appreciably with 18-micron lots losing 9 p/kg clean. As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide

In South Africa greasy wool prices gained 1.7%

Ten buyers purchased almost 60% of the Australian offering with Modiano Wool, Chargeurs and Dewayrin all very active once again

In Australia 81.9% of the 49.966 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 3.973 bales of crossbred wool of which 83.3% was

# Oil rises to almost \$60 per barrel

OIL prices rose to almost 60 US dollars per barrel on Monday following growing security concerns in Nigeria, a strike threat in Norway and deepening worries about insufficient refining capacity.

US Texas light crude hit 58.82 US dollars a barrel in Europe and 59.92 US dollars in the NYMEX finally closing at 59.37 US dollars. a new record

The rise to new nominal highs in spite of the recent Organisation of the Petroleum Exporting Countries' decision to increase output by another half a million barrels to 28 million barrels per day, is forecasted to continue because there are concerns that refiners will not be able to meet spiralling demand for oil in the second half of the year with US

But the latest surge has also been influenced by events in Nigeria where the United States, British and German consulates in Lagos have been closed after receiving threats from Islamic militants. Also, last week several Shell oil workers in Nigeria were kidnapped and released on Sunday.

In Norway, the world's third largest oil exporter, workers are threatening to strike over a pay dispute.

Analysts believe that the combination of these factors plus market speculation could push the price to 60 or 65 US dollars per barrel although it's forecasted that the oil barrel will be above 60 US dollars from September to April 2006, amid concerns over the tight demand/supply balance.

## stocks running below average Eleven missing after fire aboard Simiez

ELEVEN of 39 crewmembers of Ukrainian longliner Simeiz which caught fire while moored in Montevideo early Wednesday morning, remain missing.

The vessel had to be tugged out to the bay because she was carrying six tons of ammonia and had recently refuelled.

According to Montevideo port and Fire Department officials the fire started at 3.12am and among those missing are the Ukrainian captain, an Indonesian and nine Chinese crewmembers

Given the time the fire broke

out, most probably the missing crewmembers were locked in their cabins and because of the smoke have presumably died," reported Montevideo port authorities.

After twelve hours of combat-ing the blaze, "the situation is under control but the fire is not en-tirely extinguished," said a spokesman from the Fire Department.

Although flagged in the Ukraine the Simiez is Spanish-owned and operates from Montevideo.

# Provincial fishing licences concern

THE increasing number of fishing licences extended by the Argentine provinces is becoming a growing challenge for federal authorities because of the pressure on marine resources, the most recent example of which were the dismal catches of shrimp.

La Nacion reports that according to the Argentine Fisheries Under-Secretariat the annual catch of shrimp in Argentina has dropped from 73,000 tons in 1998 to 7,000 this year, which can be traced to the greater number of vessels with provincial licences.

Although under Argentine legislation provinces have jurisdiction over the 12 miles from the coastline, federal authorities believe that many times local policies don't nec-essarily match federal guidelines, and they also suspect that provincial licenced vessels also poach in

the 12 mile plus area.
"There's a tendency to solve social problems with provincial licences and that is worrying," said Gerardo Nieto, Fisheries Under-Secretary adding that it hinders the overall process of converting the industry

Mr Nieto fears that with shrimp and other species basically in provincial jurisdiction a similar situation to the nineties could arise when overfishing virtually caused the hubbsi hake fisheries collapse.

The provinces of Buenos Aires, Chubut, Rio Negro and Santa Cruz have their own fisheries legislation and extend licences on a "provisional" basis. In the last few years, according to Mr Nieto, Buenos Aires and Chubut have registered a considerable increase in the number of licences awarded, although it's very difficult to gain access to the information.

A similar scenario at national level happened in Argentina with hake between 1991 and 1997 when more vessels than the resource could stand were operating. Overfishing, depredation, corruption charges and court actions, plus the collapse of the hake fishery was the natural outcome of the situation.

"I don't have clear figures or a detailed report on the number of provincial licences, which is quite serious," admitted Mr Nieto.

However he underlined that off the twelve miles in the Argentine EEZ, vessel and fleet controls have improved significantly although they are "not ideal.

Apparently all fishing vessels 25 metres long and larger must make a satellite report of their position each hour, which is then transferred to the Fisheries Department and Coast Guard Information

and Control centres.


