Late plea change in vandalism case

IN A dramatic about turn, a Stanley man lacing an array of charges changed his pleas to guilty as his trial began on Wednesday morning

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek asked for one of eleven charges against Andrew James MacDonald to be dismissed as the prosecution did not intend to offer any evidence. This was a charge relating to interfering with a Land Rover 130 Ms Cheek also asked for a charge of taking without consent to be amended to "al-lowing himself to be carried knowing that the vehicle, a Land Rover 110, had been

taken without the consent of the owner". The remaining nine charges, three of emminal damage, three of vehicle interference and three of theft, plus the amended charge were put to Mr MacDonald who

charge were put to the macDonaid who proceeded to enter pleas of guilty to all. The charges all related to events which took place on the night and in the early hours of July 18 - 19, 2005.

Mr MacDonald originally entered not guilty pleas in May and, due to no legal representation being available, was repre-sented by Crown Counsel (A) Alison Inglis in the interim of defence counsel Adam Lodge being brought to the Is-lands from the UK for the trial.

Presenting a summary of facts Ms Cheek said Mr MacDonald had been out Check said Mr MacDonald had been out drinking on the night of July 18 and had returned home at about 11.30pm. He had asked his brother to go out "for a spin" with him and, when he was refused, walked away from their home.

Ms Check reported the offences in the time scale they were believed to have happened and a trail of destruction, beginning East of Gordon Lines where the Land Rover 130 was abandoned, unfolded. Ms Cheek said however, that it was not known who was driving the vehicle of the cir-cumstances of it being taken to where it was left in a ditch.

Overall more than £11,000 in dam-age was caused during the spree. Continned on page 3

Underage sex: youth detained

A YOUTH who had sex with two underage girls and admitted to police - "I just do them and forget them" - has been placed in detention for a month.

The seventeen year old was sentenced by the Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds, in court yesterday; he had admitted having sex with the two girls, one in January and one in June.

In mitigation, defence lawyer Richard Marlor said the youth still ascertained that the girls in question had approached him and asked for sex.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said the youth was aware of the girls' ages and that his attitude, although it may have improved of late, was both "callous and casual." She said he had not tried to be responsible and had tried to pass on the responsibility to the girls. In sentencing him to a month's detention for each offence, to run concurrently, she said it was time for him "to be brought up with a jerk" and face the "grim reality" of his action: actions.

The youth was also ordered to pay £70 prosecution costs.

AS always at this time of year storm clouds have gathered along with the clouds of smoke from Camp tires.

When conservationists make comments about how awful it is to burn and actively try to prevent farmers from this practise it worries me that all the good work that has been achieved over the years between these two groups will go up in smoke, along with the useless white grass that is being destroyed to provide some sweet pickings for sheep coming out of a hard winter - many with a bouncing baby lamb about to be born.

The farmer burns the grass to better his sheep's existence - to prevent them from falling in hidden ditches and holes and by providing slightly better food when it is most needed. He is legally bound to treat his sheep in the "best husband-like manner."

As to whether there is added nutrition from an early burn, I don't think the jury would be out too long on that one if they were to witness the sheep piling onto the fresh shooting grass in a month's time. Nevertheless there seem to be rumblings in the undergrowth about

Nevertheless there seem to be rumblings in the undergrowth about putting a stop to this agricultural activity: I feel this would be a pointless avenue to go down, the end result would be an unnecessary animosity about further restrictions. Conservationists need to work with, not against, the farming community and vice versa, heavy handed methods - such as a ban - are not the answer.

There are already sensible guidelines in place so that the conditions for burning can be monitored. Sometimes at this time of year it is already too dry and licenses would not be issued. It is unfortunate that, as with this year, it is still very wet and now is the best time, as some birds are nesting, to get a burn that will merely strip the dead grass off the top and not cause any lasting damage.

I've not heard of any restrictions being put in place for other forms of pasture improvement and surely nobody could be naive enough to think that rotovating, flailing, direct drilling, ploughing or even strip grazing for that matter doesn't in some way disrupt the breeding process of small birds. The land has to be farmed one way or another.

The farmer and the conservationist have worked brilliantly together over recent years to the overall benefit of wildlife in the Islands - let's not see it fall apart over a dwindling farming method that is in fact "burning itself out."

AS census night approaches and more and more people read through the forms they're required to complete. I'm surprised that we've only received a couple of calls from people bothered by some of the questions. Why, for instance, is the government asking how much I spend on fuel

Why, for instance, is the government asking how much I spend on fuel and electricity and what the size of my car engine is, when surely this information is readily available within the government's own Treasury and Police Departments? On principle it's tempting to boycott such questions - not that I would dare do such a thing, Mr Rowland.

(Actually, it is even more tempting to be a little more imaginative such as the hundreds of thousands of people around the English-speaking world who, taking exception to questions about their religion on their national census, recorded their religion as 'Jedi Knight').

Conference season draws to a close

THE Falklands contingent at the Conservative Party Conference say they have been "considerably busier" than they were at last week's Labour Conference.

Councillor Janet Robertson attributed the increased level of interest in the Falklands to "the general association of the Conservative Party with Mrs Thatcher and the Conflict."

She commented, "It is true that Tories of older generations see the conflict as one of Mrs Thatcher's proudest achievements and support the Falklands partly in loyalty to her

"What this illustrates is the need to continue attending the conference in order to build on the work to date and ensure that we continue to command support with younger generations as well and irrespective of particular loyalties."

So busy were Ms Robertson and her colleague Cllr Andrea Clausen that they were unable to attend many of the speeches made during the conference, although Cllr Robertson did get to hear Party Leader David Cameron's closing speech.

They had the chance to sit in on a couple of 'fringe meetings' with Liam Fox, Shadow Defence Secretary. Councillor Robertson said Dr Fox addressed the issue of energy security: "His line is that the current large suppliers of fossil fuels to Europe are countries like Russia and Iran. There are security issues there the UK has to take account of ...

She said he also spoke of the need to find other sources for fossil fuels but said she and ClIr Clausen did not take this statement as a cue to push the Falklands.

She explained, "We were interested in listening - we don't really want to stand up in front of numbers of people and say, 'remember us, we've got oil in the South Atlantic', it's not something we necessarily want to be shouting about from that angle, especially considering that there is no guarantee that we have resources in any case."

"We've got to be aware of the way possible prospective governments are thinking..." Cllrs Robertson and Clausen

Clirs Robertson and Clausen were both interviewed by ITV Central for a programme they are making next year, to commemorate the anniversary of the Falklands War.

Clir Robertson said they both used the interview to look not at the past but the present and future: "We managed to highlight the changes in the Falklands that there have been; we don't want to be focusing totally on the war..."

She said that, overall, the experience of the party conferences highlights the need to keep the Falklands at the forefront of people's minds - "both the British public and the influential decision-makers." She added, "We can also learn a

She added. "We can also learn a great deal in terms of considering British policy issues and the development of political thought in Great Britain."

Inquiry into headteacher's resignation

AN independent review is to take place into the circumstances surrounding the resignation of the former headleacher of the Falkland Islands Community School.

Alan Purvis resigned earlier this year due to, according to Councillor Richard Stevens, "professional reasons"

In an interview on Falklands Radio broadcast yesterday, Cllr Stevens said, "The Governor has recently met with Alan Purvis, they have discussed Alan's concerns and the Governor has asked Keith Biles to investigate and review the issues that Alan has raised. Keith will be looking at what Alan has raised then he will be submitting his report to the Governor. Then the Governor will respond to what is in that work."

Cllr Stevens said it would be up to the Governor whether the report is released to the public or not.

Continued from front page Moving west, Mr MacDonald smashed the majority of the windows of a Ford Sierra near Falklands Fresh. He entered the fenced premises of Falklands Fresh and caused damage to two vehicles and broke the window to a building used as a fish smoker.

Continuing west, Mr MacDonald caused damage estimated at £11,000 to 14 vehicles belonging to Neil McKay parked in two separate vehicle parks.

Arriving at Rowlands Rise he entered a Land Rover belonging to Mr Melvyn Lane-Sampson and removed keys and a jacket; Ms Cheek said it was believed he was unsuccessful at taking the vehicle because it was petrol and difficult to start.

At Sulivan Street he entered a vehicle belonging to Lucinda and Michael Bennett. There were no keys inside but he removed a money belt containing a wallet, cards and several other items.

Further west on Hansen Hill he entered a government Land Rover outside the home of Neil Clifton. The money belt, but not the contents, from the previous vehicle was recovered from this vehicle. The key had been turned in the ignition, resulting in a flat battery, but the vehicle was not moved. Two full and a part packet of eigarettes were removed.

Ms Cheek said it is believed that Mr MacDonald then returned to his home on Jersey Road.

When arrested on July 19 Mr

MacDonald denied going out again after going home from the pub or having been in the Gordon Lines area within the last six months.

Ms Check said forensic evidence matched a casting of a footprint taken from between two of the damaged vehicles with footwear seized from Mr MacDonald and that forensics supplied strong evidence that glass fragments taken from his shoes were from around the time of the incidents or soon after.

When this evidence was put to Mr MacDonald in December he further denied the incidents.

Defence lawyer Adam Lodge said that there had been a minimum of inconvenience to the owner of the Ford Sierra, Derek Cantlie, as the vehicle was for spares and therefore "reduces the seriousness."

He said that most serious is the damage to the commercial vehicles owned by Mr McKay, but added that none were rendered inoperable pending repairs, business was not affected and vehicles were in use until such time as they could be repaired.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds asked for a presentence report to be prepared to see if there is any community order appropriate. She told Mr MacDonald that the incident had been quite a "spree" and that he had taken no account of other people's property.

The case was adjourned until November 29, for sentencing.

Murrell River regulations come into effect

WITH the trout fishing season now underway and a road leading to the Murrell, there are more people visiting the area than ever before, making it more susceptible to damage caused by human activity.

To address this, a Management Plan for the area was drafted in 2005 and formally accepted by Executive Council. One of the recommendations of the Management Plan was that regulations be enacted to contain the level of fishing in the area and signs be erected to encourage people to think about the effect their actions may have on the area. The Murrell River Regulations were passed in 2006 and have now come into effect.

The Environmental Planning Department have asked that the public note the following regulations pertaining to trout fishing:

• Fishing is <u>not</u> permitted off the culverts or within 100m of the

crossing on either side.

• Catch is limited to **three** trout per day (each must weigh over 1.5lb or 0.5Kg).

 Fishing is not permitted upstream from the area known as Drunken Rock.

The Management Plan also encourages people to drive carefully to minimise track marks on camp and to observe the Countryside Code.

A spokesperson for the Environmental Planning Office said that signs conveying the above regulations and considerations will soon be erected at the Murrell and people are asked to abide by them at all times.

September weather: more snow but less wind

From the Mount Pleasant Meteorological Office TEMPERATURES and sunshine were below average in September, with rainfall above average. Snowfall was above average but the month was less windy than normal.

The mean maximum temperature for September was 6.3C, below the long term average of 7.5C and the third lowest mean maximum on record.

The highest temperature recorded was 12.6C on the 29th and the lowest maximum was -0.8C on the 24th.

The mean minimum temperature was 0.0C, below the longterm average of 0.9C and the third lowest mean minimum since 1986. The lowest minimum was -4.6C on the 19th and the highest minimum of 4.9C was recorded on the 10th.

It was an above-average month for rainfall, with a total of 44.5mm compared to the normal for September of 34mm. The wettest day

There were 118.3 hours of sunshine, less than the average of 131.9 hours. The highest daily total was 10.4 hours on the 29th. There were two days when no sunshine was recorded.

The monthly mean wind speed was 13.3 knots, less than average of 15.4 knots. The highest hourly mean speed of 36 knots and the highest gust of 51 knots, both occurred on the 28th.

There were 16 days with gusts over 33 knots, less than the average for the month. Gales were recorded on four days, which was average for the month.

£900 penalty and ban for drink driving

A YOUNG man narrowly avoided being sent to prison when he appeared in court this week.

Having previously pleaded guilty to charges of drink driving (117mg of alcohol per 100 ml of breath) and driving without a licence, Roy McKay was fined heavily by the Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds, on Wednesday.

In issuing Mr McKay with his fine, Mrs Faulds told him she was concerned about the level of alcohol he had consumed before driving and said he was lucky he had not been in an accident. "Your level was so high, your ability to drive must have been severely impaired," she told him.

She said she had given careful consideration as to whether he should be sent to prison however, given that Mr McKay would lose his job if this were to happen, Mrs Faulds decided that a high financial genalty would better suit.

financial penalty would better suit. She fined him £900, to be paid in monthly instalments of £50, "...to give you time to think about it."

Mr McKay will also pay £70 prosecution costs and is banned from applying for a driver's licence for 30 months.

Combining 'strands' will strengthen transport infrastructure

IT IS time that the investment in the three separate strands of transport infrastructure - shipping, air services and roads - were better integrated.

That's the view of the government's Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins, in a report on the Integrated Transport Study.

The government has invested a huge amount of money in transport infrastructure in recent years. In 2005/06 the investment exceeded four million pounds and represented approximately £1,800 per head of population.

In his report to last month's meeting of Executive Council which followed a year of public consultation. Mr Simpkins commented. "The three strands of transport in-frastructure have been developed in isolation from one another but the immunent completion of the originally planned road network provides the opportunity to examine how future investment and use of the transport infrastructure might be integrated for the future.

"This approach was universally accepted during the consultation process."

Shipping

The decision by Executive Council to appoint Workboat Services Ltd, subject to contract, to provide a new coastal shipping and ferry service addresses many of the points raised in the consultation period in relation to shipping. Mr Simpkins said. But it also requires further investment in the road infrastructure and terminals, "...for example, to enable the MoD to service mountain top sites by road, in order to maximise the potential benefits and achieve a degree of integration that does not currently exist."

The current road building programme is scheduled to be completed in 2008, but the programme

will now need to be modified to take account of the proposed new coastal shipping service and opportunities to secure income from the MoD. Mr Simpkins reported.

"The Transport Advisory Committee is already in the process of considering this issue. There are however genuine concerns about the ability of roads on West Falkland to withstand use by military vehicles of the size currently in use.

"Persuading the MoD to use different vehicles which fall within the winter weight limits of the roads will assist in reducing impacts but some increased investment will still be needed on the road infrastructure, in terms of capping and regular maintenance, than would otherwise be the case, simply due to higher traffic levels. This was, of course, an issue which featured during the consultation process."

FIGAS

Air Services generated the greatest response during the consultation and is. Mr Simpkins said, the service which is likely to undergo the greatest degree of change as a result of a more integrated transport strat-

"Additionally, there is the previously identified need to consider replacing the existing airframes which, because of their age, require an increasingly greater amount of time to be dedicated to maintenance therefore generating increased cost."

The subsidy to FIGAS for 2005/ 06 exceeds £1.1m (over £3,000 per day and over £120 per passenger).

In his paper Mr Simpkins told Executive Council a significant amount of work needs to be undertaken to evaluate possible changes in the nature of the service. "Fundamentally, a clear statement of the nature of the service which FIGAS is required to provide for the future, must be made."

He continued, "Significantly reducing the subsidy must be a prime objective. Completely removing the subsidy would obviously be highly desirable but is, in my opinion, probably unrealistic in the short to medium term at least."

What happens next?

The consultation on the Integrated Transport Study has been useful in raising public awareness of the amount of investment the government makes in transport services. Mr Simpkins told ExCo, adding, "It is time that the investment in the three separate strands of transport infrastructure was better integrated and at least some dividend realised." He continued, "Annual investment will actually have increased with the proposed new coastal shipping and ferry service and detailed work must now be carried out to realise the benefits which the new service can provide."

In his paper. Mr Simpkins suggests the Transport Advisory Committee be asked to examine the impact the work needed for the new coastal shipping service will have on the road construction and maintenance programme. "Furthermore. I propose that TAC should receive periodic reports on the internal review of FIGAS which must lead to the preparation of a comprehensive Business Improvement Plan, but recognising the fact that it may be necessary to commission external resources to assist in this process."

The Integrated Transport Study was published for consultation in September 2005; as part of the consultation process Mr Simpkins delivered presentations in Camp and Stanley to the public and special interest groups.

He said the study deliberately made no recommendations about the future structure of transport. "It was a position statement describing the (then) situation with regard to the provision of transport infrastructure."

The consultation process posed a series of questions designed to Illicit views on the transport infrastructure (i.e. highways. coastal shipping and FIGAS) and how that provision might change in the future.

Carrs to say goodbye to South Georgia

The Carrs say they would have



From a purely military point of view, minefields are defensive. They are there to deny an attacking/invading force that area of ground they wish to occupy. If an aggressor approaches that area and recognises the area denied to them, it forces them to an area covered by the defenders (the Killing Ground). That is the principle of "mine field defence".

Nature reserves apart, they (the mine fields) serve the Islands well. This is not Salisbury Plain, as you try to equate, military exercises are not conducted Island-wide whereby access is denied to the general public.

I agree, there is no such thing as a "safe mine field", so therefore Kirchner, should he care to read this, will realise, that his own Argentine forces have denied him one of the best landing places in the Islands around Stanley, (that should wipe the smile off his face).

So, now they have provided <u>us</u> with one of the best deterrents of invasion to try and take the Islands by force, which they have paid for and not the British tax payer. Yes, they know where they were laid, but they do not know how the movement of the mines over the years has changed the lay-out pattern.

I know that some tourists have thought that the minefields have been put in place to stop them from entering areas of wildlife sensitive areas, but those that thought so have been shown the errors of their ways when shown anti-tank/personnel mines not too far from their feet...

So, in conclusion, my reply to your final paragraphs, as one who was here to help regain these islands from Argentine aggression, they help deter <u>them</u> from trying (if they are so foolish) to land in places where they thought we would, but did not.

And, in answer to your final paragraph. I believe we have the best educated population regarding mine fields. As far as I am aware the last casualty injured entering a mine field (apart from one horse and a cow), was the QMSI Mines or the Officer Commanding from EOD in 1983/4 trying to clear/mark an area of an Argentine Mine Field. The chart he was using was not accurate, it was Argentine.

'Exciting times' for Co-op members

WE thought your readers may be interested in the formation of a new Falkland Islands company.

This has been set up following a workshop held during Farmers Week 2005 that highlighted a wish by participating farmers to explore alternative wool marketing options. Many farmers, after reviewing their marketing costs, were becoming quite alarmed at their continued escalation.

As individuals, it is almost impossible to take advantage of direct selling to processors because average-sized Falklands farms do not produce enough wool to put together an attractive parcel of a particular grade to attract multinational wool processors, scale brings creditability. They also do not as individuals ship large enough quantities to be able to negotiate more favourable freight rates.

This dilemma was believed by our government agencies to be best solved by the formation of a wool marketing company, akin to a co-operative, something that has been proposed by farmers and FIC at different periods in the past.

This suggested solution was presented at Farmers Week 2006 by David Lambert who was employed as a consultant by FIDC to write a report on how the proposed scheme could operate in the Falklands.

This report highlighted several interesting facts. Practically no Falklands wool is processed in UK, yet most Falklands wool is sent, at great expense to the Falklands farmer, to the UK - why send it there ?

Around 94% of all Falkland wool is being bought by three European topmakers, more buyers must be attracted. There is potential for Falklands organic wool, something which many Falklands farmers grow but lack official certification

After this presentation two further public meetings were organised as well as an exchange of correspondence by e-mail and personal exchanges by phone and in person. There was sufficient interest in this concept by Falklands farmers to enable councillors to confidently release the required funds for the company to be established

The aims and objectives of this new co-operative are quite simple, to maximise nett income from wool sales by:

a) Direct sales to wool processors of appropriate sized lots of Falklands wool, both mainline and oddments. Coupled with prompt

Mine clearance: Britain should honour commitment

WITH regards to the ongoing debate about the clearance or not of Falklands minefields surely the question should be, if Britain, along with other signatories, has signed up to a commitment to clear mines from areas for which it is responsible then it has an obligation to do so. transfer of wool proceeds from buyer to farm account. More buyers must be attracted to the attributes of Falklands wool.

b) Efficient shipping of the product from farm to processor making best use of economies of scale that the Company members can collectively amass. Also making best use of the recently introduced container service to reduce shipping costs.

c) Direct consequences of the Company will be that more employment will be created in the Falklands, and more money will be retained in the local economy.

The present members of the Company produce 47% of the Falkland Islands woolclip. According to the feedback received by the official FIDC-run consultation process, farms representing only 17% of the Falkland Islands woolclip said that they definitely would not support the co-operative this year. The remaining farms have made no indication either way. Nevertheless many of these farms are following developments with great interest.

The Company will need to appoint an experienced Senior Wool Trader, predominantly resident in the Falklands during the wool selling season, to set up the day to day running of the business. All policy decisions will be made by a majority of the members through their Directors.

Once the Company has been set up and is running successfully, the intention is for the Senior Trader to be locally employed. Government funding is only required to establish and develop the business. Once this has been achieved then the fixed commission on sales, paid by member farms from the outset, will be used to cover all running costs.

Founder members are extremely grateful to FIDC. FIDB. DoA and, in particular, councillors for having the vision and confidence in this project to provide the necessary funding to enable this initiative to be implemented.

Any new project will attract some criticism and this has been no different. It is all too easy to tread familiar well worn paths, but now we must be careful where they lead.

For those of us who wish to be involved in the Wool Co-op these are exciting times with other options and new opportunities. The 'way forward' for us does not involve standing still.

Standing up for smokers' rights

"THE right of self-determination." As a Falkland Islander this phrase has extra special meaning to me as it is quoted in the defence of our existence as a country.

It is then with great misgivings that I follow the efforts of an element in the Falklands to deny this right in the very country that relies so heavily on it being recognised. This is about both a legal

group's, smokers, right not to live under threat of further marginalisation, and the right of business establishments to choose freely for themselves, as they have done so since our ancestors settled the Falklands, whether or not they continue to cater to smokers as they have done so for over 150 years.

Already we see that some businesses have chosen not to allow smoking and in the case of social gathering areas I choose not to patronise those places - two freely made choices.

Even some employers have gone beyond the compromise of a smoking room and forced their smokers outside, in some cases even after years of loyal service.

I know that some people have the attitude of, "I don't like it, so quit" (a familiar attitude). Well:

A/ Tobacco is highly addictive and, for many, the problems faced through withdrawal are bad enough without having a bully trying to force you into it. I know, for my part, when someone sets out to bully me I push back as, I have found in the past, not to do so sends the message that what they are doing is all right and they intensify and expand their efforts.

B/ Whilst tobacco remains legal, thereby encouraging further

addiction to it, and we pay tax and duty, then why should we give up a freedom that generations of Falkland Islanders, and the businesses who choose to cater to them, have enjoyed?

There are those that would deny that smokers have rights, but, as Professor Lawrence Freedman points out in his book on the Falklands war, a right is not only gained by documentation but also gained through the passage of time, in the case of smoking in our country, the lifetime of it.

Until such time as the govern-ment is prepared to do something apart from collect revenues - about tobacco and help not bully smokers, then any action to further marginalise smokers, or any legal group, is an act of intolerant totalitarianism (an example that should not be set for the future).

Whilst this has been about the threat to the freedom that so many generations of smokers have enjoyed, there have been many times that I should have spoken out but thought that the freedom being lost was inconsequential or did not concern me. For this complacency I am sorry, as I know that many out there are anything from annoyed to outraged at some loss, or threatened loss, of a freedom or way of life in our country.

That being the case, here are a few phrases to keep in mind: Give them an inch, they'll take a mile. You can't do right by doing wrong. (Very apt for the tobacco question). All it takes for evil to flourish is for good men to do nothing. United we stand, divided we fall. (Again, 1 am sorry for the times I've ignored this one)

After fierce skirmishing with the tiny Royal Marine garrison they succeeded in capturing His Excellency the Governor and triggered the biggest amphibious operation since D-Day

Exactly seven weeks later three young Royal Marine Commando officers stepped ashore from a landing craft in Bomb Alley. San Carlos waters, just 70 miles west of 15,000 Argentinian troops. Second Lieutenants Denning, Davies and Shaw had just one aim: to sup English ale in a free capital.

Over the next month Paul Denning, Andy Shaw and John Davies endured air attack, saw warships sink, yomped their massive loads the entire way, to eventually assault, and overcome, a determined enemy dug in on welldefended mountains. Only one of them made it to the pub. Paul and John were both wounded during the attack on Two Sisters.

This November they re-unite for the first time since those dark days to re-trace the route they yomped, to learn how the Falkland Islanders saw it then, and how they see their futures now and, hopefully, to make it all the way,

24 years late, for that well-earned pint, finally together.

The three intend to do the yomp in early November, to arrive in Stanley in time for Remembrance Sunday.

Paul commented, "We are getting great help from Gary Clement (Chairman of SAMA82 Falklands) who is arranging much of our basic administration, for which we are enormously grateful

"Gary has also arranged for us to stay both on the route and later in Stanley with local families, which we look forward to immensely and again are very grateful for.

On completion of the yomp phase they intend to conduct a couple of presentations to the school and anyone else in Stanley who would like to hear their story

DC4 hijack 1966: Water buffalo to the rescue for an event 'open to Argentine airmen only' was to raise his hand when he saw

On September 28 1966 an Aerolineas Argentinas DC4 aircraft. on an internal flight between Buenos Aires and Rio Gallegos, was hijacked by an extreme right wing Argentine nationalist group. Condor. They forced the pilot to fly to the Falkland Islands, where he landed on the Stanley Racecourse.

The first Falkland Islanders who went to look at the aircraft were met by the hijackers brandishing guns. and were bustled into the plane. The hijackers, led by a blonde woman. locally nicknamed the 'Blonde Bombshell¹ then ran up the Argentine flag and demanded to speak with the Governor, A siege ensued, with the Argentines finally giving themselves up after a day and a half.

The prisoners were to be transported to the Argentine ship. Bahia Buen Suceso, anchored off Cape Pembroke, by the motor fishing vessel Philomel

There were obvious problems with berthing a motor fishing vessel alongside a larger ship. On the first attempt, the swell three miles out was too great and the prisoners were returned to St Mary's Annexe.

The second attempt was successful but far from smooth. Philomel's skipper. Captain White, reported that when the prisoners boarded the they had started singing 'rousing songs' which continued until as far out as the Lower Tussac Island when the songs died away and there was a certain amount of "unpleasantness." The prisoners had been put down in the hold and were not good sailors at all, it turned out.

When the Philomel did get alongside the Bahia Buen Suceso it was to find approximately 50 unarmed but uniformed Argentine Marines lining the rails. When the prisoners realised they were being greeted with stoney silence it is reported the rousing songs stopped altogether.

How do you free a bogged plane?

Meanwhile the aircraft had become bogged down on the peaty ground of the racecourse and would have to be freed before it could become airborne again.

The late John Rowlands had bought a 'Water Buffalo' swamp tractor from the Falkland Islands Government using his entire savings of £107 in August 1966 and had no idea what he could use it for.

His son Robert explained that a £20 per day hire fee was agreed with his father and by the time the plane was retrieved and towed to the grandstands to prepare for take off, the machine had paid for itself.

Attempts were made to tow the plane out, Robert said. but due to

the rubber and wire track pads of the Buffalo being old, the tracks had to be repaired several times. It was decided to use the winch fitted to the Buffalo to make the pull; this was successful and a JCB 4C wheeled excavator was used on the other wheel to keep the plane straight on the course once it had started to move

All the seats and unnecessary fittings were removed from the plane and sufficient Avgas fuel to get the plane back to Rio Gallegos - shipped on the Bahia Buen Suceso according to some reports and supplied by FIGAS according to others - was loaded

The take off

Robert said. "It was in the air by the time it passed the 400 yard mark on the racecourse and the pilot Ernesto Garcia seemed to earn the respect of all for his handling of the

aircraft."

A souvenir copy of the radio broadcasts, painstakingly transcribed by Shirley Hirtle was produced, after the dust had settled. The commentary Mr Young, Assistant Manager

of the Falkland Islands Company Ltd (FIC) had given regular radio updates throughout the ten days the DC4 was on the racecourse and its subsequent departure. The souvenir booklet culminated in an amusing commentary from the broadcasting hut at the racecourse, comparing the aircraft's departure to one of the year's biggest social events, the Christmas race meeting.

"There is a large crowd up here and, so far as we are concerned, we hope and pray that the only entry, with its four riders, will rise into the air at the 500 or 600 yard mark and rapidly be lost to sight, passing no doubt within sight or sound of those Camp stations who reported the aircraft's inward flight ten days ago.

This event is open to Argentine airmen only, the colours are the blue and white of Argentina. There are four experienced and confident menon board who hope to fly this aircraft back and I am sure that the hundreds of people watching the start will be keeping their fingers crossed and wishing them luck.

Mr Young then proceeded to give details of the four airmen: Chief Pilot, Ernesto Fernandez Garcia, 39 years of age, married with one son with 15,000 hours flying experience; Copilot, Silvio Edgardo Laprida, 35 years old, married with two sons, 6.000 hours flying; Radio Officer Joachim Soler, 53 years of age, married with three children and 16,000

course," quipped the commentator. "I note that the members of the aircrew are wearing Royal Marine berets and they are obviously taking

these back with them as souvenirs of this event. Captain Martin is wearing as his souvenir the pilot's jacket. There have been innumerable goodbyes and countless photographs taken." Mr Young then describes several

engine starts and stops, while Captain Ernesto Garcia and his crew walk the course and a lorry moves in with sand, filling the grooves made by the aircraft on landing. As a Land Rover containing a fire-fighting party moves to the end of the course near 5pm things get under way.

Falkland Islands Government Air Service (FIGAS) pilot Jim Kerr was stationed down the racecourse and

the aircraft lift off.

They're starting, they're moving, they're away down the course, going straight and level, the dust is flying, the plane is at the 200 yard mark, 300, 400 and is off - off the ground and away; a perfect take off at 400 yards with never a wrong Movement

"The aircraft rises up to clear the 150-feet masts, then circles round over Stanley harbour and is certainly going to come back and back and bid us farewell

The aircraft is described as circling the town and tilting her wings before descending slightly and "tearing up the Racecourse at high speed." before turning south west, gaining speed and heading in a "homeward direction'

A broadcast announcement later in the evening reported that the airliner had arrived safely at Rio Gallegos. •

Did you know?

A LAND Rover owned by PWD (as the FIDF did not have its own transport in 1966) was loaded with ammunition in transit when the DC4 made its appearance.

The driver had 'knocked off for dinner' and left the vehicle in the dockyard, with the intention of returning and completing the job. Tom Wallace, unaware of the vehicle's cargo, on hearing the DC4 jumped in and drove away to park at the winning post on the racecourse, heeding advice previously broadcast to prevent any unwanted aircraft landing on the racecourse from taking off again.

This was in line with instructions some years earlier when Michael Fitzgerald landed a small aircraft on the Racecourse, planted an Argentine flag and had taken off again before anyone could stop him. (Patrick Watts)

THE Colonial Treasurer, Les Gleadell, a Falkland Islander, was Acting Governor at the time as both the Governor. Sir Cosmo Haskard KCMO MBE, and the Colonial Secretary, the Hon W H Thompson MBE (of Kenneth the Kelp Goose fame), were out of the Islands at the same time. Patrick Watts pointed out that this has never been allowed to happen since as it was obviously an embarrassment to the British Government not to have one of their appointed diplomats present during the occasion of one the world's earliest ever aircraft hijacks.

THE RMS Darwin sailed that week with possibly the biggest consignment of air mail, and certainly the most newsworthy, since the Battle of the River Plate in 1939. (W H Young)

Gerald Cheek reported that, as a recruiting campaign for the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF), the whole incident "worked wonders". He, along with about 24 others, joined the FIDF that week and trained intensely throughout the summer.

The DC4 Chief Pilot, Ernesto Garcia, was forced to land a Piper aircraft in the Andes in 1963 at an altitude of 15,000 feet. It took him three days to walk down the mountain and he lost 10 kilos of weight in that time. (WH Young)

It was a good end to a successful day where *Dumbarton Castle* showed her operational capability remains at its best.

After two days alongside in Stanley which included the first visit by His Excellency the Governor Mr Alan Huckle to *Dunbarton Castle*, the ship returned to Mare Harbour to carry out flying senals with our colleagues at 78 Squadron.

The ship's company carried out a series of winching and landing-on evolutions before moving into the more challenging 'Night FLYEX' which is a potentially more dangerous undertaking.

However, the exercise was carried out to a high standard, once again showing the high level of capability of not only *Dumbarton Castle's* ship's company but also the ability of the Falkland Islands' Search And Rescue (SAR) Sea Kings and their crews.

Dumbarton Castle has now returned to the more regular duties of patrolling the Falklands, we hope to see you soon.

Low cal recipes for the Falklands

Salmon and broccoli pancakes

DON'T be put off by the length of to distribute careful

this recipe. The end result is well worth the effort, is low in fat and contains a mere 320 calories per serving. Serves four.

Ingredients

8 pancakes (see below) 8 oz broccoli, broken into small florets

- 1/2 pint skimmed milk
- 2 tablespoons cornflour
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard

7 oz canned salmon roughly flaked 1 tablespoon snipped fresh chives or dill

salt and freshly-ground black pepper

Pancakes

4½ oz plain flour 1 egg, beaten ½ pint skimmed milk 2 teaspoons sunflower oil salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method

Sift flour and seasoning into bow!. Add the egg and half the milk. Whisk to a smooth batter and then whisk in the remaining milk.

Place a small (8 inch) non stick frying pan over a medium heat, when hot brush the surface with a little oil.

Pour one eighth of the batter in the pan whilst swirling the pan to distribute carefully. Cook for about 30 seconds or until the surface has set. Carefully flip over with a fish slice or palette knife and cook for a further 30 seconds.

To keep the pancakes warm and moist, stack between sheets of greaseproof paper and wrap in foil.

Pancake filling

Preheat oven to Gas Mark 5/190C/ 375F.

Cook the broccoli in lightly salted boiling water until just tender and drain thoroughly.

Blend the milk and cornflour until smooth and then heat stirring constantly, until smooth and thickened.

Beat in the mustard and add the broccoli, salmon and herbs.

Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Divide the filling between the pancakes.

Roll up and arrange, seam down in an oven proof dish.

Cover with foil and cook for 15 - 20 minutes, until heated through.

Variation

Replace the salmon with four hardboiled eggs, chopped.

Largest ozone hole on record for September

THIS year's ozone hole is the largest on record for the time of year, so dig out the sunscreen and sunglasses and keep covered up. Ozone levels across Antarctica

dropped rapidly in mid September, Sarah Lurcock from South Georgia warns, and a further warning from Jon Shanklin, Head of the Meteorology and Ozone Monitoring Unit at the British Antarctic Survey says that ozone levels for South Georgia are forecast to drop on October 5, reaching very low levels on the 6th, with the effect remaining until at least the 8th.

Sarah says that lower than normal temperatures within the Polar Vortex (a natural cyclone of supercold, super-fast winds over the Antarctic area) have allowed stratospheric clouds, that are key to ozone destruction, to form over a larger area than normal.

"The ozone hole grew rapidly from mid-August, reaching some 26 million square kilometres in mid September, one of the largest holes on record for this time of year."

A prediction made at the SCAR conference in Hobart in July suggested that the 2006 ozone hole is likely to be one of the larger and deeper ones (perhaps 28 million square kilometres). The World Meteorological Organisation says that severe Antarctic ozone losses will very likely continue to be observed for at least the next 10-20 years because of the slow decline of ozone depleting gases.

The ozone hole will pass over the Falklands before it reaches South Georgia. There is a lot of free information available that allows the ozone levels over the Falklands to be monitored. The BAS ozone web page at www.antarctica.ac.uk/ met/jds/ozone has the current status of the ozone hole. BAS ozone data and links to many sources of information. A trip down memory lane

Twenty-four years ago - October 11, 1982

A large Union Jack was stretched across the entrance to the Government House grounds in a successful although unnecessary attempt to stop the vehicle. Falkland Islands Committee spokesperson Velma Malcolm said. "we just wanted to show our thanks for being liberated."

Aircraft carrier HMS *Illustrious* anchors in San Carlos waters and many of the great ship's crew attend a memorial service for the men who died in the area during the British landings.

The accommodation ship *Rangitita* breaks her moorings and runs aground near the cemetery and is quickly rescued by one of the naval tugs.

30 Field Squadron of the Royal Engineers complete an underwater pipeline which will connect fuel tanks near the airport to a buoy alongside which tankers in Port William will be able to refuel.

Lengthening of Stanley Airport progresses with the project expected to be completed towards the end of the month. Phantom jet fighters are expected to arrive shortly thereafter.

Civil Commissioner Hunt announces that 24 Falkland Islanders and people resident in the Islands have been awarded honours ranging from a Knlghthood to the BEM. Mr Hunt, Jeremy Moore and Sandy Woodward are thought to be recipients of Knighthoods.

Ten years ago, October 2, 1996

FROM a total of four candidates offering themselves for nomination for election to Legislative Council on October 17, three have been successful. The announcement of June Besley-Clark, Elvio Cofre and Mike Summers was overshadowed by the exclusion of Jan Cheek as a candidate on technical grounds. Mrs Cheek's application was disallowed when it was discovered that her nomination paper had been subscribed by an elector who had also subscribed another candidate's paper. Mrs Cheek commented, "although my paper was last in, it was put in early in the afternoon, and had I been made aware it was invalid, I had ample time to either find another signatory or to complete another whole set of documents."

FIGAS employee, Jane McGill gains her private pilot's license after four weeks of training with Huffman Aviation in Florida.

The Falkland Islands new Director of Agriculture is Bob Reid who is due to arrive in mid-November, returning after 30 years, he formerly worked in the Islands as a travelling teacher.

The newest vessel to become involved in the Falklands fishing industry is the Norwegian longliner *Eldborg*, chartered by CFL specifically to target Kingelip.

Four years ago, October 4, 2002

A VET pays a visit to the scene of the humane destruction of 27 head of cattle on Falklands Landholdings land at Goose Green. The decision to make the trip to Burntside by vet Kevin Lawrence follows concerns raised locally that there may have been related animal welfare issues. Falklands Landholdings Manager Greg Bradfield said the animals were part of a larger herd, moved from Mount Pleasant to Burntside because they were old cows and in poor condition as a result of the dry summer and cold winter.

The issue of ill treatment of fishing crew by Korean officers is again the focus of attention by Falklands authorities after police receive a complaint from a Chinese crew member of the longliner *In Sung* 66.

The Falkland Islands Cricket Association receives funding from the Shackleton Fund to bring a coach to the Islands. Warren Scott who was a professional player and represented New Zealand at international level will arrive during the first two weeks in December.

A massive $\pounds 8,000$ is raised at the Falklands Conservation charity auction with $\pounds 6,180$ raised from the sale of mainly locally-donated artwork.


THE British Antarctic Survey summer season began this week with the arrival of the research vessel James Clark Ross on October 2.

Wool report - week ending September 29 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices slipped significantly for the third successive week at sales in Australia.

Prices held up slightly better in South Africa to finish "steady overall", however once converted to pence per kilogram clean, South African prices remain slightly below Australian auction room levels.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide", prices fell by between three and seven pence per kilogram clean for fleece lots between 18 and 25 micron while broader types lost one to two pence/ kg clean.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down 5 pence per kilogram at 294.4 p/kg clean compared to last weeks closing level of 299.6 pence/kg clean.

Farmers are urged to critically examine current wool price levels relative to the same period last year for financial planning purposes. It is extremely disappointing to note that prices for fleece wool lots broader than 21micron are currently 5% to 13% below prices achieved for the same types 12 months ago. Only fine wool lots between 18 and 20 micron are attracting higher prices than 12 months ago.

In South Africa 98% of the 3.588 bales on offer were sold. The main buyers during the sale were

Chargeurs (968 bales) and Modiano (677 bales). In Australia 84% of the 67.430 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 6,232 bales of crossbred wool of which 88% was sold.

Sales continue next week in Australia, New Zealand and South Africa.

Q IS IT correct that all workers with the right to reside in the Falklands and working at MPA will pay tax from January i 2007?

Assistant Taxation Officer Tanya Lee provided the following answers.

A All those workers at MPA who under the provisions of the Constitution or of the immigration law of the Falkland Islands have a right to permanently remain in the Falkland Islands will be subject to tax under the provisions of the Taxes Ordinance.

If this is correct have companies employing said workers at MPA been informed of this officially?

A number of employers have been in contact with the Taxation Office already but all employers will be officially informed in the normal way with the issuing of employer packs on the 2^{nd} December as is done each year

What mechanism has or will be put in place to collect taxes from employees at MPA?

As with all employees subject to tax within the Falkland Islands, employers must comply with the Payment on Account of Tax (POAT) Regulations. Employers will make a POAT deduction equal to the amount specified in the tax tables, as set out in the employer packs issued in December each year.

Will an employee working at MPA and paying tax in the Falklands be taxed on a company vehicle, and if so, at what rate?

Any employee who receives the benefit of the private use of a company vehicle will be subject to tax under the benefit in kind rules. At present the taxable amount is £40 per day up to a maximum of £3,000 per year (75 days). Depending on which tax band the income of the employee falls, the maximum amount of tax payable per year is £750 (£3,000 x 25%). **Q** WHY has the price of local fuel just increased yet again when oil prices have dropped by approximately 20% over the last few months?

General Manager of Stanley Services Ltd, Robert Rowlands replied. A The price of LPG increased on 01.10.06 by 1.3% and petrol increased by 1.5%, this reflects a revaluation of the cost of stock held. It should be taken into consideration that this new stock was purchased in June which is long before the reduction in international product prices seen over the last five weeks.

With a minimum of three months stock of product being held, price rises and reductions take some months to take full effect.

Q GIVEN that FIG has granted planning permission for four dwellings on the old Mink Farm, does this mean that other FIG land is available for other people to make similar requests for houses on FIG-owned land?

Can anybody buy land from FIG to build houses on and, if so, how much does the land cost?

Crown Counsel (A). Alison Inglis answered

A Any individual, company or other organisation is entitled to apply for planning permission to develop any plot of land, irrespective of whether they own the land. FIG cannot stop persons from applying for planning permission to develop FIG land. However, any person applying for planning permission to develop land which they do not own is required to serve notice of their planning application on the landowner.

Planning permission to develop land is granted by the Planning and Building Committee, not by FIG. The grant or refusal by the Committee of planning permission to develop FIG land does not influence consideration by FIG of any application to acquire such land, except that FIG will not dispose of land unless outline planning permission has been granted for its development.

Applications to acquire FIG land should be addressed in most cases to the Lands Committee, via the Secretary Margaret Butler, Attorney General's Chambers, Malvina Gardens, Stanley. (Applications for land at Lookout Estate should be made through FIDC, and applications to acquire farm land owned by FIG should be addressed to the Director of Agriculture.)

of Agriculture.) The Lands Committee has received and considered an application from four local residents to purchase land at the Old Mink Farm, Moody Brook Road. The Committee's recommendations will be forwarded to Executive Council, which will determine the application.

Pending the outcome of the Housing Strategy, FIG has not announced any plans to release land for building. However, any individual, company or other organisation which identifies land owned by FIG which may be suitable for house-building is entitled to apply to the Lands Committee which will consider their application and make recommendations on it to Executive Council.

Following completion of the East Stanley Development, FIG has not fixed any price for residential building plots. The price at which land may be sold for house-building is a matter for negotiation between seller and buyer, or where appropriate will depend on the outcome of any tender process.

Q COULD the Registrar General tell us how much has been spent so far on the census and how much he anticipates the total cost to be?

Registrar General John Rowland

provided answers to the following. A To date £7,554.07 has been expended on the census. The current authorised budget for the census is £12.000, however it is anticipated that the budget will be insufficient. There are a number of reasons for this, including the increased cost of printing since the last census. The Registrar General is not in a position at this time to estimate how much the total budget figure will be.

Why did the Registrar General deem it necessary to have all census forms hand delivered when on the previous census they were posted? Under s.3(1) of the Census Ordi-

Under s.3(1) of the Census Ordinance it is the duty of the Registrar General to make arrangements and do all such things as are necessary for the taking of the census and for that purpose to make arrangements for the preparation and issue of the necessary forms and instructions and for the collection of the forms when filled up. The census forms were hand delivered as it is the best way to ensure that all those that should have a census form get a form.

During the last census numerous census forms, which had been posted, were returned to the Registrar General and then had to be hand delivered by him. The hand delivery of forms also allows members of the public to address any immediate concerns and questions to the person delivering.

Why was the Registrar General delivering papers on West Falkland and not in the Registry overseeing the operation, and will he be in Stanley during the collection period?

The Registrar General delivered the papers on West Falkland as he was satisfied it required an experienced Camp driver, particularly at this time of year. Those persons involved in the census which he would otherwise have asked, were already tasked to deliver elsewhere.

The Registrar General will be in Stanley during the collection period.

FLH: no pressure from government departments to join Wool Coop

PART TWO of an interview with Falklands Landholdings (FLH) General Manager Owen Summers and Chairman of the Board Councillor Ian Hansen.

With FLH opting to join the Wool Cooperative at the eleventh hour there has been speculation in farming circles as to whether the Board had been pressured in any way by government to join enabling the quantity of wool needed for the operation to be viable to be met.

Mr Hansen said that there was no pressure applied and this is obvious from all the minutes of meetings. "I made sure we sat down with the business plan and we looked at all the figures to see if we would gain or lose anything and the decision was made after that. There was no pressure at all from government. DoA, FIDC, David Lambert or anyone.

Mr Summers added however that it did not mean there would not have been pressure if they had decided against joining the Coop. Mr Hansen agreed, adding that had councillors considered it to be beneficial to the Falklands as a whole they might well have overruled the decision taken by the Board.

Penguin News asked if there was any obligation or pressure from government for FLH to supply a certain amount of sheep to the abattoir on an annual basis.

Mr Summers said that the income from animals going to the abattoir is necessary for FLH, however it has to be carefully weighed up, "a balance has to be struck," to maintain flocks. However, he added, "I guess, if councillors wished, they could tell us to supply."

In the last season 70% of lamb that went through the abattoir came from FLH farms and 43% of the wethers. 52% of all the animals to the abattor were from FLH.

Mr Summers said that ideally they were, "...looking to get it back to about a third (33.3%)."

The amount of sheep being supplied to the abattoir at present in a

good year is not normally detrimental to the maintenance of flocks said Mr Summers, however last year it was.

was. "It has to be reviewed every year and as the balance of ewes is changed we can put more through. We are looking at replacing the wethers taken out with ewes and young sheep. "Raising stocking levels is bound to be a bit further down the track." he added.

The structure of the FLH meetings and the fact that there is very little information in the open parts of the meetings is often a subject for critisicm, however there is little that can be done about it, said Mr Summers, as most of the closed part of the meetings deals with accounts or individuals living on the farms. "It is just the nature of the agendas, we are not trying to hide anything," reassured Mr Hansen.

At what level are final decisions made by the farm managers?

"The Board sets the policy, and, with managers meetings, the best way to facilitate that policy is worked out," said Mr Hansen.

With regard to the supply of sheep to the abattoir the managers are told what the target is and they put forward the numbers they can supply. "The Board always accepts the manager's decision on final numbers," said Mr Summers.

"As always everyone is welcome to come along and enjoy the outdoors and the wonderful bird life that the Falklands have to offer."







Comment by Managing Editor, Jenny Cockwell

I HOPE people take the time to give their take on the proposed changes to the education structure. There seems to be much disquiet about some of the ideas contained within the consultation document and it pays to speak up if you're concerned - whether you're a parent or not.

The way the accompanying questionnaire has been written, while I expect it follows best practice for such work, seems to have rubbed people up the wrong way and I'm one of them.

Some of the questions are so angled you are obligated to agree for fear of sounding like a complete idiot. Who on earth would say the school should not play a significant part in the heart of the community it serves or that Special Education Needs should not be strengthened? (*)

Why are we even being asked to agree or disagree when we don't have any detail about how the ideas behind the questions are going to be carried out. (If it is planned that this detail is to be revealed at the public meeting, I trust additional such meetings will be organised Island-wide.)

I'm all for improving the communication between the different areas within the Education Department and for providing the best possible options for students and their teachers, but there are some substantial measures being suggested and both councillors and their constituents need to make sure it's not just a question of change for change's sake.

We're all aware of the problems the department has been experiencing over recent years; butit is imperative the situation is kept in proportion and not used as justification for what could be a costly restructure. We need to be clear the benefits outweigh the pitfalls for all children in the Falklands.

*Clare Cockwell, teacher at Fox Bay until the school recently closed, summed up the problem many people have with the questionnaire: "Question four says teachers should not have to work in phases with which they are not comfortable. Camp Education has secondary phase children who have chosen not to go to school in Stanley.

"If the outcome of the restructuring is that these children get a secondary travelling teacher and specialist teachers released for visits to Camp, then that's great. The right of these children to an education has been recognised across the system, and I would totally agree with the question.

"If, however, the outcome was that those children lost their highly competent and dedicated (though primary trained) telephone teacher and had to rely on homework set by the senior school, then I would totally disagree with the question."



'Gib is good model for Falklands'

THE recent agreement signed between Gibraltar, Spain and the UK is a good model to be followed in the South Atlantic, a visiting Foreign Office representative has said.

Leigh Turner (right), the new head of the Overseas Territories Department at the Foreign Office described the Gibraltar agreement as "a very interesting and significant development".

He explained, "The Spanish Government has basically decided to set aside the problem of sovereignty for the time being and move forward on practical cooperation and I think in a way that is a good model; in the same way we already have a sovereignty umbrella with Argentina and there is a lot of practical work we could do together."

He said that, in his personal view, the best way forward for Argentina is to "try and build up the confidence of Falkland Islanders over a prolonged period."

Of the Gibraltarian agreement he said, "They've moved forward some very difficult issues and some deep seated controversial issues such as pensions and the use of the airport which have been complicating relations for many years between Spain Gibraltar and Britain."

Cooperation with Argentina on fisheries is important, Mr Turner said, and he is keen to get a programme of regular talks with Argentina established again, following the disappointment at the South Atlantic Fisheries Council (SAFC) meeting last month.

Mr Turner reported, "We have indicated we are ready for more talks to move forward practical cooperation on Fisheries.

"The SAFC has not been taking place. But we want to see the reestablishment of that process and we've indicated to the Argentine side

Saints in Falklands consulted on air access

AIR access to St Helena has suffered delays but it is hoped that construction work will begin in 2008 on establishing an airport to serve the island, says the St Helena Access Project Manager

Sharon Wainwright has spent the last week in the Falklands updating St Helenians at Mount Pleasant and Stanley on the problems experienced in awarding the contract and the work that is now in progress.

Three South African companies were short-listed to tender for the airport this year, however in July, as they were due to undertake a site visit, all three withdrew due in part to the financial risks involved.

Ms Wainwright said that the main factor is that there is a lot of design work required by all three companies at their expense prior to tendering, but only one company can receive the contract.

A fixed price was also required for the design and construction of the airport which the companies felt

Pre-trial review for Falklands police officers

AS THE trials of two Royal Falkland Islands police officers charged with perverting the course of justice draws near, a pretrial review was held on Wednesday to monitor progress with preparations.

Referring to what is a preliminary issue, Mr Watson said that the defence were keen to have Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds hear admissibility statements. He said he had every faith in the court here, adding that any judge just coming to the Islands would to deal with the issue would find themselves in difficulty.

A further review will be held on October 18.

Your questions answered

O BEARING in mind the recent decision by the government to effect taxes on Falkland citizens Mount working at RAF Pleasant, can the government confirm how many persons from other nations are working there that have been given full Falklands Permanent Residence rights and how many people resident there are on the voting register but do not pay taxes, despite having these rights and being resident at Mount Pleasant for many years?

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Collector of Customs Robert King, responded to the first part of the question.

A I regret that the Customs and Immigration Department is unable to provide the information re-quested in regard to how many permanent residence permit holders or persons enjoying FI status there may be currently employed at Mount Pleasant as the above categories are free of immigration controls.

Such persons are therefore entitled to take employment anywhere within the Falkland Islands without having to first obtain a work permit from this department.

Assistant Taxation Officer, Tanya Lee. provided the following information in relation to the second part of the question.

Any person who has a right to permanently remain in the Falkland Islands under the constitution or immigration law will be subject to tax here. However, if their total taxable income, including benefits in kind, foreign income such as savings and investments etc is below the personal allowance of £12,000 they may not have to complete a tax return.

To be eligible to go on the electoral register you must either have Falkland Island Status or Naturalisation. Therefore all persons included on that register are within the charge to Falkland Island Tax.

Q THERE has been a lot of discussion recently about the cost of dental treatment - can the Dental Department publish a list of what treatment is free and what is currently charged for and the rates?

The list of patients waiting for a dental appointment is rumoured to be over 600, can this list be made available in the hospital for patients to check if their name actually appears on it?

Director of Health and Services Nikki Osborne provided the following answer.

A We do publish a list of charges it is pinned up on the wall of the dental department and available on request from reception.

The dental waiting list is available in the hospital but we could not possibly put it on display (if that is what the questioner is implying) as that would breach all of our rules on confidentiality. Anyone who wants to know if they are on the list only has to ask at reception. It is not a problem.

Magic mushrooms cost man heavily

STANLEY man Richard Alan Young was fined £600 after a small quantity of psilocybe (magic) mushrooms were discovered in his possession.

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek told the Court that a Customs officer had reason to approach Mr Young on suspicion of possession of illegal drugs on June 22. A small amount of dried mushrooms (79ing) were discovered at his quarters at the Ross Complex. He admitted having taken a handful, adding that it did not have the "desired effect"

In interview Mr Young said the mushrooms had been given to him the previous Sunday

Forensic testing confirmed that psilocin, the constituent of mushrooms that is illegal to possess, was present.

Defence lawyer Keith Watson said that the 79 grams represented one third of the entire amount Mr Young had possessed, adding the whole quantity was, "little more than a trace," A view that the Senior Magistrate was not inclined to agree with.

Mr Watson said the mushrooms

were not hidden, just lying in the crease of a newspaper as if discarded. He said his client was not aware that magic mushrooms were a Class A drug and wished to assure the court that he wouldn't have "come within a mile of them if he had."

Mrs Faulds said she noted that Mr Young had been very honest and forthcoming and that the amount was very small however she added that the possession of drugs is viewed very seriously "The Falklands are fortunate not to have a drug ridden culture and long may it stay that way

Mrs Faulds said it was a very small quantity, not capable of being useful to anyone but Mr Young and even then doubtful if it could achieve a pyschedelic reaction.

Because of Mr Young's previous good character Mrs Faulds chose to fine him at the lower end of the scale. an amount more than could be discharged instantly "so you can think about it.

Mr Young was fined £600 and £70 prosecution costs.

Education proposals - too top heavy or a better support network?

PARENTS, teachers and the community at large are being asked for the views on the future development of education in the Faiklands.

A consultation document on the creation of a "Falkland Islands Learning Campus" (only a suggested name at the moment) has been sent to all residents in the Islands along with what is proving to be a controversial questionnaire.

According to the paper from the Director of Education, Barbara Booth, the campus will combine the School, Infant and Junior School, Camp Education and the Training Unit under one management system. "It will provide opportunities for career progression and promotion, and continued professional de-velopment for staff will be a part of every day school life. "The ca-reer structure for staff is to be based on levels of responsibility and also gives an opportunity to get the most out of the resources available and budgetary provision.

According to Mrs Booth, the current structure inadequately supports or encourages the sharing of knowledge, skills and resources be-tween professionals. The department does not make the best use of human and financial resources for the benefit of children, young people and the community as a whole" Currently, she said, there are five

separate units each with its own management system. "There is little cross department working. There is no career structure for teachers or non-teaching staff and the resources available are not shared."

Camp Education The "bringing together" of the Camp Education Service and Infant and Junior School is proposed, "as a result of current circumstances." Mrs Booth explained, "The

numbers in Camp at the moment are very small and it is difficult to justify a completely separate unit. Over the past year staff have. in fact, been discussing how a merger with the primary school might be brought about. Those discussions now need to inform the consultative process.

By bringing together the Camp Education service with the other units it can be seen that there could well be a strengthening of knowledge and skills available to the young people of Camp rather than an undermining of what already exists."

Former Camp teacher Clare Cockwell feels Camp Education is the service which is going to be most affected by the restructuring. She commented, "For Camp Ed to effectively lose its office-based staff, there must be an assumption at some level that those staff and that office don't perform any essential service.

"If I were a Camp parent, I would be wondering where my children's telephone lessons were going to come from and how their work and resources were going to be adapted and prepared for their unique situation.

She continued, "If I were a Travelling or Settlement Teacher, I'd be wondering who was going to be the qualified and experienced camp teacher on the other end of the phone to help gather resources, to offer support ad advice after a hard

day "I'd wonder how the very close relationship between travelling and telephone teachers was going to be

maintained, and I'd worry about having to deal with other members of staff who have no idea what it's like to teach often very mixed ages of children in extreme isolation.

Life in Camp can sometimes feel very isolated for the parents of small children and for the teachers of those children, Mrs Cockwell said, "...and the importance of that cru-cial daily telephone link in terms of support and reassurance, with someone who understands the situation, should not be underesti-mated."

She said it would be a "desperate shame" to celebrate Camp Ed's 110th birthday by closing it down "Camp Ed is the only government department that exists solely to serve the Camp community. every other area the service this community receives is worse now than it was a few years ago.

"We have lost our dental service, our opticians visits, our nurse's visits, most settlements have lost their coastal shipping service, and the axes now seem to be out for FIGAS. Pretty soon, the only peo-ple who'll be able to live here are those in perfect health, with a decent vehicle and the leisure to spend half a week driving to Stanley for a dental check- up. If Camp Ed goes, you'll be able to rule out families with young children too.

Special needs

In the consultation paper, Mrs Booth outlined suggestions relating to special educational needs. The development of a dedicated cross phase Learner Support Unit is pro-posed, staffed with specialist SEN teachers. Mrs Booth explained, "This concentration of expertise will allow for the enhancement of support programmes for children who experience learning difficulties at an early stage and provide continuity of provision for the most vulnerable through from primary to secondary provision.

The objective is to ensure that pupils with special educational needs maximise their learning potential

Also proposed is the creation of an Education Welfare Officer post, attached to the Unit, which, Mrs Booth said, "...will allow for more

effective home/school liaison and support the multi-agency approach being introduced by the Health, So-cial Services, Royal Falkland Islands Police and the Education Departments

GCSE

According to Mrs Booth, not all students learn in the same way and for some the traditional route through academic based GCSE subjects does not support their preferred style of learning.

"Currently, success in General National Vocational Qualifications examinations is the equivalent of four passes at GCSE grades A-C. Soon to be introduced is the vocational diploma in education which encompasses work-based learning and accreditation. For the young people of the Falkland Islands it is important that this opportunity is available to them as well as to their UK counterparts."

Carol Peck, whose son is due to sit his GCSEs next year, told Pen-guin News that if she had young children coming up through the edu-cation system, "...l would be very worried about the standard of education I could expect for them

She believes the education system as a whole is, "...failing any child who leaves school without some GCSE qualifications to give them a wider range of choices for education in later life.

While adding that not all children are academically inclined and a vocational course from the age of 16 may be the way forward for them. Ms Peck added, "the system should not be giving up on them at 14

She also believes that children at a senior level should be guaran-teed teachers that are trained in specialised areas, "...and while I sup-port the professional development of teachers it should not occur at the expense of the children.

This week for instance one of their two sciences teachers is overseas with Barbara Booth and cover is being provided by another teacher with no science background. How can they hope to get the best out of the kids without the most suitably

qualified teachers teaching them?" Ms Peck worries that the proposed new structure will reduce the standard of education available to Falklands children. The proposed structure, she said, "looks like a case of too many chiefs."

She asked, "Why does the new structure require an Assistant Direc-tor as well, when they intend to keep a Head Teacher and Deputy Head for each unit? And how much class room teaching will people in these posts do? Very little I suspect.

"It would certainly be interesting to see the job descriptions of some of the posts. Quality Assurance Co-ordinator for instance...

Of course not all parents feel the same way. A parent of an In-fant and Junior School student, who did not wish to be named, said she believed there is a need for change and commented, "...the proposed new structure has not come too soon. I am impressed with the level of detail which has gone into the consultation document and on the whole agree the with majority of the intended changes.

She said the Camp Education and Training Unit should come under the same management service as the Infant and Junior School and Com-munity School, "...although person-ally I would like to see the Leisure Centre come under that same management service."

Commenting on the criticism aimed at the education department in recent months, the parent said she did not feel this was wholly justified. "I would hope that the new structure would give a better sup-port network to all teaching staff? co-ordinators whilst providing what should become an improved educa-

tional structure for our children "Whilst initially I thought the scheme was very top heavy I do appreciate that in making such vast changes to one of the community's most important services, it is important to have a strong management structure.

The consultation period on the proposed changes to the structure of education ends on October 31.

FALKLAND Islands author Graham Bound made a quick trip home this week along with filmmaker Mike Ford. The pair were in the Islands to plan the filming of a documentary presenting the "human interest story" behind the 1982 war

The material of the film, while not actually based on Graham's book, Falk-land Islanders War, will overlap, and fol-low the Islanders' story from April 1, the day before the invasion, through to liberation on June 14.

Mike, who has thirty years' experi-ence in photography and tilm, explained, "It's through the eyes of those people who were here at the time, so Falkland Islanders themselves, ex-patriots and indeed the Naval Party who tried to defend the seat of government."

Two films will actually be produced: one will be an hour long documentary for Channel Five and the History Channel, expected to be screened in the UK in March, and the other will consist of all the material that they film and accommodates as many people as possible that wish to be involved

Mike said he plans to return to film from mid-November through till early December. He will follow Graham back home and use him as a guide to the viewer. "It's the vehicle for us to get into the

The film will also involve a degree of dramatisation. Mike explained, "Within the film we will be using some archive material that was shot at the time and we are keen to shoot reconstructions in the same way. If we do it right then anybody watching will have trouble spotting what was shot in 1982 and what was shot in 2006.

He has original footage captured in Stanley by the late Joe Booth and from

Pat Gray who was at Goose Green during

the war and is now keen to loan props for the reconstructions including Argentine uniforms and vehicles.

Graham and Mike are both grateful for the assistance they have already received from Islanders. Graham commented, "Thanks for the help and hospitality, it has really been significant. People have given us big chunks of their time."

Preliminary Health Census results

A PRELIMINARY analysis of the Health Census was discussed by the Health and Medical Services Committee on Tuesday. A more complete analysis will be possible when the data has been entered into a database prepared by the Computer Department.

The paper at present does not include any of the free text comments that people made; these are being analysed as are the questions on smoking and alcohol.

The data should be treated with some caution, said Ms Osborne. "Until the population census data is collated later in the year, it will be impossible to say how representative the sample is of the overall population.

In total 832 questionnaires were returned a response that Dr Roger Diggle said was very good compared

with the average response to ques-tionnaires of 17 - 20%. The majority of respondents (56%) originated from the Falklands with the next largest group (30%) from the UK

76% of people who answered the question said their health was either very good or good, less than 2% of those who answered said their health was poor or very poor. Dr Diggle pointed out that this refers to people's sense of well being at the time of answering the question and does not necessarily represent the health of the population as people can feel perfectly well when they are in fact

sufering from a quite serious illness. 22% of respondents said they had a long term illness or disability,

Camp consultations now 'working well' NEW procedures are in place for Camp telephone consultations with a doctor which seems to be, "working well," said Councillor Cockwell who reported on dissatisfied patients behalf at the previous Health and Medical Services Committee meeting.

Patients are encouraged to request consultations before 9.30am whenever possible and the receptionist is responsible for ensuring that doctors are informed of all consultation requests in a timely manner. They are also responsible for keephowever only 42 people said their illness or disability prevented them from doing their normal daily activities for more than five days a week

A graph demonstrating those factors that people believe are having a detrimental affect on their health highlighted food and lifestyle as factors which most affect both Stanley and Camp residents.

Camp found age, money and health services high factors while the committee were interested to note that loneliness was a higher factor for Stanley residents than Camp.

Surprisingly usage of the health services is high within the 16 - 24 year old age group, although it was pointed out that people access the Health Service in different ways such as occupational medical checks, family planning etc.

Councillor Cockwell stressed that when compiling statistics, "we are fishing in a small pond," and one or two people can have a high impact on the results.

61% of respondents thought health services were good or very good and just over 10% thought that health services are poor or very poor. Older residents appeared generally more satisfied than younger age groups with a good/very good rating amongst 65+ age groups of 71% and a poor/very poor rating of 4%.

The data after further analysis will now be incorporated into the health of the nation report and discussion in the hospital management team will take place to see what, if any, action needs to be taken

ing the patient informed of any delays in responding.

Director of Health Nikki Osborne explained that the doctor dealing with Camp consultations is also the on-call doctor and can be called away to emergencies. She added that a call from the receptionist when this happens is appreciated by the patient in Camp.

If the caller says that their call is urgent the receptionist will put the call straight through tothe casualty nurse.



Medical Treatment Overseas policy updated

THE Medical Treatment Overseas Policy has been updated and the ExCo approved changes introduced.

Those eligible for treatment overseas are Falkland Islands status holders or people who have been granted a Permanent Residence Permit (PRP) or work permit enabling them to stay in the Falklands for six months or longer. "People who are not eligible for

overseas treatment must demonstrate their ability to pay before overseas referral can take place," said Ms Osborne.

Criteria for KEMH-funded referrals are that the treatment is necessary on clinical grounds, is available through the NHS in the UK and the treatment complies with any locally developed referral guidelines, alternative treatment is not available in the Falklands or likely to become available within a reasonable time-scale on clinical grounds; not to refer would have a serious detrimental effect on the patients health and well being; and there is a predictable and defined end to the treatment in the case of long term conditions.

The hospital will not normally refer overseas when a visiting specialist will be able to undertake necessary treatment in due course and will not fund cosmetic treatment.

Ms Osborne said the decision about the location of treatment, either the UK or Chile but exceptionally elsewhere, will normally be on the basis of the cheapest option that is consistent with the patient's clinical situation and will be assessed on clinical urgency and/ or social/psychological issues.

Occasionally a patient may ask to be referred somewhere other than the place approved by KEMH. If

the cost of such an alternative options is higher, KEMH may, at its discretion, approve the request but the patient will be expected to pay the excess.

The paper that will go to ExCo says that KEMH will book and pay return air fares for the patient once their appointment date is known. Once discharged the patient is expected to liaise with FIGO if in the UK or KEMH directly if in South America in order to book the return flight, normally the first available after being declared fit to fly, no accommodation will be paid for after this date.

If a patient wishes to be seen overseas during leave or holiday which has already been booked, KEMH will not pay for the flight costs.

With effect from July 1, 2006 patients have made a financial contribution towards the cost of elective treatment overseas at the rate agreed by ExCo. Emergency and urgent treatment overseas remains free of charge and any patient already undergoing overseas treatment before this date will not be expected to pay.

The contribution towards elective treatment (£400) is "one-off" and it is the responsibility of the medical officers to determine whether the patient's treatment falls into the elective category

KEMH will only pay for a family member or friend to escort a patient if the patient is under the age of 18, critically ill or is a woman under going a high risk pregnancy In special circumstances consideration is given to patients who are so ill, either mentally or physically that they are unable to cope with the tasks of daily living.

Working in harmony with wildlife

THE Editorial comment in last week's *PN* V18 No23 reference camp fire burning and conservation was a very accurate highlight of a real and growing problem.

I would also add comment to the letter "why are we still burning" by Ali Liddle of Stanley who seems to care very little about the ever increasing volume of bureaucracy that has been thrust upon the Falklands since 1982. Prior to the conflict there were many dedicated farmers and their families working in complete harmony with the surrounding wild life.

Now, with fear of starting world war three, I would like to make some comment. Before 1982 the wildlife was thriving both on and off shore. Farmers collected tens of thousands of wild eggs with no adverse effect to their populations. Quite the opposite in fact.

It was always widely believed that by taking large numbers of the birds' first-laid eggs you delayed the hatching of their chicks to coincide with the arrival of the food chain that would sustain them. The exact opposite is now occurring. Chicks are hatched and the adult birds cannot find the food reserves needed to feed them with the result the chicks are now starving.

Burning the land does have arguments for and against - we do not burn because of risk to the peat banks - but burning lowland where the grass is rotting and sheep can-not get to the new sprouts is desirable. It also removes rotton carcasses that are infested with rats and mice. I do not agree with Ali that it destroys the wildlife and other habitat for the same reasons that the later hatching of wildlife in these areas do in fact thrive. The military starling now plagues the local crops, especially the potatoes because of their increasing numbers. I could write a book on what we used to enjoy as the real way of life when

a last nature was firmly in charge.

Now, thanks to the ever changing policies introduced by some who believe they know it all, our previous envied way of life has been eroded away not just Island-wide but particularly in the farming sector, where there are so many rules enforced that one almost needs a licence to use the toilet.

I have often aired my annoyance through the paper of the rapid changes that previous councillors and government promised would never destroy our unique way of life. While I also realise that if we are to progress forward there has to be change, most of the changes that are happening are not altogether in line with what the majority are yet ready for. One councillor was heard to say that he did not want to create a little bit of England here. Well, it seems that certain people have already begun the process.

Our people took great care of these islands before 1982 and while there are still a good many trying to continue to do that, we find it ever more difficult to actually carry out this mission.

So what happened to the days when our leaders said they would not change our way of life? The truth is that had we been allowed to follow the old traditional management of our country we would not be in the situation we are in today.

Conservation is a good thing which our older society valued, but sadly there is a new body of people who are taking control from the farming sector who haven't a clue as how to actually preserve our wildlife and are constantly agitating the land owners because they are trying to bring about change that does not actually work within this rural community.

So before the bullets and bombs start flying in my direction I am away to dig my nuclear bunker, che. Robin Goodwin Green Field Farm.

As a farmer I thought burning was absolutely wrong. As a conservationist I think the same. Sally Blake Stanley


Mystery red-head is from the East not West


STUDENTS from the Community School had the unique opportunity to watch a former top British trampolinist in action in their Sports Hall last week

IT IS important that the European Union's Overseas Territories (EUOTs) are seen to take a lead on environmental issues.

That's the view of Councillor Richard Davies who, along with Cllr Mike Summers and External Development Officer, Jenny Smith, attended a meeting of EUOTs in Greenland last month.

While admitting he had initially wondered "why the Falklands needed to go to Greenland to talk to these places from all over the world," Cllr Davies said he was struck by the influence the EUOTs can have. He commented, "Here you have a cohesive, functional, probably quite effective group of territories; we've got a lot more in common than I expected, they've got quite a loud voice and it is a useful forum with a growing influence in Europe as time goes on ...

Cllr Davies was particularly interested in the first day of the conference which concerned environmental issues. He commented, "One of the things that struck me was how much we've got in common as OTs. You initially think Greenland, Falklands, French Polynesia, what is similar between them?

"We're all rather small with vulnerable economies, we're all island nations, and we're all very vulnerable to the effects of climate change whether it be sea level rise, changes in weather patterns or decrease in biodiversity. The OTs are incredibly rich in numbers of species, compared with the EU

Surprisingly, only two of the EUOTs have signed up to the Kyoto Agreement on climate change and CIIr Summers spoke to the meeting of the need to set an example to the rest of the world. Cllr Davies commented: "Although we are tiny in global terms - I think we are just over a million people in the EUOTs - we've got a fairly large proportion of the world's fishing grounds and we've got 10% of the world's coral reefs in the OTs.

He said the EUOTs want to encourage the member states and the European Commission to do their bit for environmental issues: "Everyone has heard of the EUOTs and anything we do has more of a resonance than perhaps a developing nation of a million people would have. It's important we are seen to take a lead, to set fairly high standards.

The Falklands is already well on its way to "doing our bit" for the environment, Cllr Davies said: "We've got the wind farm being developed, we've got the waste energy recovery programme being run, the Planning Department is encouraging good building standards, we've agreed in principal to grants for energy efficient boilers and solar panels.

"We can do our bit and our smallness doesn't mean that we can't have influence.'

European money

The Falklands delegation was

in Greenland to continue the quest to obtain European funding.

Councillor Mike Summers outlined the position when they were in Greenland: "The Financing Agreement (the last in a sequence of agreements required to draw down the money) has finally been agreed between FIG and the Commission. This has to go for formal ratification to the EU Commissioners, but there is no reason to suppose there will be any issue there.

"As soon as the formal agreement is notified the document will have to be signed by both parties; I believe this will be done remotely (by e-mail). We then need to produce the necessary documentation to prove that we have reached the first milestone that enables drawdown."

Approximately three million Euros stand to be gained by the Falklands. Cllr Summers said the Falklands is also nearing payment of the outstanding Stabex money of around 2.4 million Euros.

Ascension Island

While on a holiday on Ascension Island, Cllr Davies took time to meet with the island's council. The council is young, having been formed only around five years ago.

Cllr Davies said they were keen to discuss their "big issue" of land ownership and eligibility to reside on Ascension.

Last year the islanders had hoped they would be allowed to buy land in Ascension and would have rights of residency. They can currently only reside there if they are employed by one of the companies on Ascension or if they qualify as a certain class of dependent

However in November they learned from the Foreign Office that the situation was not to change, news Cllr Davies said, the island council was "extremely disappointed" to receive.

Discussing other areas, the councillors told him they are interested in importing meat and dairy products, fruit and vegetables from the Falklands. He reported, "At the moment they import pretty much everything.

"I suppose nobody really has wanted to start off a private enterprise there as there's no security; you can't own land and you can't have a right to residency

The Ascension council will continue to lobby the British Government on this issue and, Cllr Davies said, they recognise it is a "long term process.

He added, "Maybe it's a question of building up the democratic process slowly

They also discussed the Ministry of Defence airbridge with Cllr Davies. He reported, "They are trying to build up their tourist industry and the RAF is their only civilian flight in and out.

"They've got the same sorts of concerns as us such as customer care and access to seats.

After 24 years, it's goodbye Rapier Squadron

Media Operations IN A poignant moment for the RAF Regiment, 26 Squadron, the current Resident Rapier Squadron (RRS) marked their imminent departure from the Falkland Islands this week.

Two events, a sunset ceremony at Black Eagle Camp and a firing camp at Newans Station at Port Harriet, marked the contribution the RAF Regiment has made to the Islands since it arrived in 1982.

When 26 Squadron RAF Regiment hand over at the end of the month to 30 Battery, 16 Regiment Royal Artillery it will mark the end of almost 25 years of continuous operations for the Rapier Force of the RAF Regiment in the Falkland Islands.

The sunset ceremony was held at Black Eagle Camp. near Stanley airport, where the RRS set up their first headquarters. The service was attended by RRS personnel, Stanley Sea and Marine Cadets and members of the public.

As the second part of their farewell, the squadron conducted a live missile firing camp at Port Harriet on Wednesday and Thursday. The last Rapier missile to ever be fired by the RAF Regiment anywhere in the world was fired by SAC Jon Reeves, the youngest member of the Squadron.

Visitors to the range included His Excellency the Governor and from the military community, Wing Commander Mike Burt, Officer Commanding RAF Ground Based Air Defence (GBAD) Wing, and two veterans of 1982, Warrant Officer Jerry Andrew and Warrant Officer Steve Coupe, who both served with 63 Squadron during the conflict.

The ground based air defence role in the Falklands is to be handed over to the Army on October 30. From this date the Rapier missile capability in theatre will be manned by gunners from the Royal Artillery. 26 Squadron are due to disband in early 2008 but in the interim will deploy to Afghanistan to provide Force Protection to air assets there.

The RAF Regiment's relation-

ship with the Falkland Islands began 25 years ago, during the 1982 conflict.

At 6.30am on June 1, 1982, 63 Squadron RAF Regiment began its hasty disembarkation from the *Atlantic Causeway* in San Carlos Water. Almost 60 vehicles were offloaded and, 11 hours later, the main body of the Squadron disembarked from SS *Canberra* onto 'Green Beach', the codename for Port San Carlos settlement.

By June 3, eight Fire Units had been deployed; six were in the hills overlooking San Carlos Water and two were positioned at each end of the harrier strip to enable the Squadron Commander to protect this vital asset. There followed 11 days of hostilities for the deployed units, during which time the Squadron's engineers worked exceptionally hard to maintain a high rate of serviceability.

With the surrender of the Argentine forces on June 14, the Squadron almost immediately prepared to relocate to defend the airfield at Stanley, although the move itself did not occur until July 1.

By July 4, 63 Squadron RAF Regiment were in routine operations on the high ground surrounding Stanley's airfield. The headquarters and engineering element was located at Canopus Hill, which came to be known as Black Eagle Camp, named after the centrepiece of 63 Squadron's crest.

Over the next four years, a total of four RAF Regiment squadrons took their turn in residence at Black Eagle Camp and it thus became synonymous with Rapier operations in the Falklands. The Black Eagle monument remains there to this day to commemorate the RAF Regiment's contribution to the defence of Stanley Airfield between July 1982 and April 1986.

1982 and April 1986. In April 1986, the RRS relocated to RAF Mount Pleasant where it has remained until the present day. Since April 1986, the RRS has continued to provide ground based air defence of the Mount Pleasant Complex.



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

Promoting mental health: World Mental Health Day

TUESDAY, October 10, was World Mental Health Day.

This event was established by the World Federation for Mental Health in 1992 and is a global event with many countries such as the US, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, UK, Norway, Germany, France, Egypt, Chile, Austria, Zambia, Kuwait and other small countries taking part. This is the Falkland Islands first participation in this international event

The aims of World Mental Health Day are to:

Promote mental wellbeing Promote a better understanding of mental health.

Raise awareness of mental health issues and prevent mental illness.

Raise awareness of mental health issues and prevent discrimination against those who suffer from mental illness.

Mental illness describes a wide range of disorders including dementia, schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, depression, anxiety disorders, eating disorders, post traumatic stress disorder, self harm and addictions.

There are many causes of mental illness. For example, our genetic makeup, our life styles, our personal choices, the quality of our relationships with others, our luck and our fortune i.e. our personal wealth, our economic and political security and the nature of the communities that we live in Together all of these factors shape the opportunities and life choices available to us

Some of these aspects which effect our mental wellbeing, we can control and take responsibility for i.e. what we do with our lives, how we choose to live our lives, how we treat others and how we allow others to treat us. However, there are many other aspects of our lives that we can not control like our genetic make up, or our childhood experiences, e.g. family history of dementia, being abused or neglected, or losing people we love through divorce or bereavement. Similarly we can influence but are not always able to control our environment, i.e. natural disasters or wars.

What we can do is accept and understand that many aspects of life are traumatic and can have an overwhelming effect on our psychological and emotional wellbeing. That often people will carry emotional scars and may need help to come to terms with what has happened to them.

The World Health Organisation (WHO) 2004 has recognised that mental illness is within the top five causes of ill health and disability worldwide, this top five list includes HIV; obesity; cancer and cardiovascular disease.

It is estimated that by 2020 mental illness will take over as the second greatest cause of ill health and disability worldwide, only surpassed by heart disease

For example one in four people will suffer depression at some point in their lives. (WHO 2006)

One million people will commit suicide each year. Accounting for more deaths each year by suicide than are killed by homicide, wars and terrorist attacks combined. (WFMH 2006)

One in ten young people in the UK will develop a mental health problem (Young Minds 2006)

One in ten elderly people over the age of 65 will develop dementia.

Locally, the Falkland's population suffer from the full range of mental illnesses the same as every other country in the world. As a rural community we have slightly higher levels of depression and alcohol abuse, this is similar to other rural areas.

What we can do to maintain our mental wellbeing:

1. Find out what works for you keep you mentally healthy 10

2. Nurture and look after your own mental wellbeing.

3. If you are aware that your mental health is compromised, seek

4. Recognise your own limitations, i.e. what you can deal with and when to seek help.

5. Show respect for those who suffer mental illness. No one enjoys ridicule or feeling excluded by others. It can make the difference between someone feeling brave enough to seek help, rather than suffer in silence or even attempt to end their own life.

A trip down memory lane

Twenty-four years ago, October 18, 1982

FALKLAND Islander Glyn Jones dies in a motorcycle accident after suffering multiple injuries when his motorcycle collides with a Mercedes Benz vehicle on Davis Street.

Defence Minister John Nott is to visit the Falklands later in the month to inspect military establishments and units on the Islands.

Tony Pettersson and Gerald Cheek arrive back in Stanley after representing the Falklands in shooting at the Commonwealth Games in Brisbane. Tony and Gerald received an ovation almost equal to that given the Australian team when they strode around the track with the Falklands flag on the opening day of the games.

Five civil policemen arrive to supplement the local force which has declined in strength to just one Superintendent, one PC and one WPC.

It is reported that Dr Daniel Haynes and his wife Dr Hilary will not return to the Falklands. Both doctors were arrested and incarcerated at Fox Bay with a number of other local residents by the Argentines. Following the surrender they left the Islands and have now resigned their positions.

The first of a number of Phantom supersonic jet fighters arrive and land perfectly on the extended airstrip at Stanley Airport

Representatives of Everards Brewery arrive on board MV Norland with the intention of establishing a small brewing plant.

The Falklands plan to go ahead with the 150th anniversary celebra-tions although the date of the proposed festivities has been put back by almost two months to February. The regular Christmas race meeting will not now be held and grumbles have been heard that this will make for a very dull festive season.

69 Ghurka Independent Field Squadron are now hard at work at Dunnose Head following completion of the airstrip extension in Stanley, repairing buildings which were damaged during the war and at Moody Brook replacing the bridge and removing debris while a third group has been working on Stanley common. Mined areas at settlements are hoped to be fenced in time for the season. Other works include restoration work at the racecourse and building Portacabin accommodation in Stanley.

Fourteen years ago, October 16, 1992

A RECENTLY formed fishing company. Mermaid, is given a grant of £69,000 and a further loan of £45,900 to help promote Far Eastern involvement in the Illex fishery. Mermaid Fisheries Ltd is made up of a joint venture between local company JBG and a Taiwanese fishing company, China Sea Products Development Corporation. Famous naturalist and television presenter, Sir David Attenborough is

to visit the Islands in November, while sunbathers and people working outside are being warned to protect their skin while a hole in the ozone layer is dangerously close The Royal Navy's ice patrol ship HMS Polar Circle is renamed after

her predecessor Endurance at a ceremony

More than 50 people are treated for food poisoning after a Tristar was diverted to Dakar Food at a Dakar hotel is being blamed for the outbreak.

Fishing license applications for the First Season 1993 are down by approximately 80 compared to the number for this year's first season. Less than a week old, 832 chickens are flown in by Tristar as stock for

Leslie Cligham's chicken farm and it is hoped they will be producing eggs by February

Nutt Cartmell of Goose Green makes a gift of his house on Pioneer Row to the Falklands Museum and National trust. The house is one of 30 kit houses shipped from the UK in 1849.

The Norwegian vessel Tamar FI is due to arrive in mid December to replace the coastal shipping vessel Monsunen


Four years ago, October 11, 2002

Wool report - week ending October 6 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

IN another poor week for sales of greasy wool, prices in South Africa, New Zealand and Australia fell almost "across the board". The exceptions were mid micron (24 and 25 micron) lots which held in value in Australia and increased in South Africa.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide", fine lots of fleece wool lost between 2 and 6 pence per kilogram clean while broader fleece types moved in value by between -2 and +1 pence per kilogram clean.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down 2 pence per kilogram at 292.4 p/kg clean compared to last weeks closing level of 294.4 pence/kg clean.

In South Africa 96% of the 3,588 bales on offer were sold. The main buyers during the sale were Modiano with 1390 bales and Chargeurs with 899 bales. In Australia 86% of the 49,481 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 5,399 bales of crossbred wool of which 92% was sold

Sales continue next week in Australia, New Zealand and South Africa with a combined offering of almost 85,000 bales.

Falkland Islands farmers are urged to review their 2006/2007 budgets in line with current market conditions. While a downturn in greasy wool production is probable next year, particularly as dry/ drought conditions emerge in Australia, it is not realistic to automatically expect prices to increase in line with the fall in production. Falkland Islands cricket on track for International status

by Roger Diggle, Chairman Cricket Association THE Regional Development Officer of the International Cricket Council (ICC), Grant Dugmore, will be visiting the Falkland Islands between October 28 -November 4 to inspect the cricketing scene here in the Falklands. This is part of the process involved in the Cricket Association's application to become Affiliate Members of the ICC

If affiliation is successful then the Falklands would be entitled to enter the regional competitions and also the ICC holds annual training courses for coaches and umpires to which we would be invited. The ICC also has modest development funds which we would be entitled to bid for.

Cricket within the Islands has developed strongly in the last few years from one annual Governor's v CBF match to a three match series. Thanks to sponsorship we have been able to build training nets on the FICS playing field and we have been able to buy other equipment such as a bowling machine and a batting cage which has helped with the development of both adults and juniors.

Four years ago we were lucky enough to secure the coaching of Warren Stott, former New Zealand Test player. The adult team then participated in the Santiago Cricket Festival playing Chile 1, Chile 2 and 1 Zingari.

This year has seen the hugely successful development of the junior side culminating in the U17 tour of Chile in April resulting in two wins and two losses which was an outstanding achievement for their first ever competitive matches.

In order to develop further and satisfy ICC criteria, we have expanded the cricket into four adult teams: Stanley, Moody Brook, Saints & Mount Pleasant. We will be holding a 20 20 competition at Mount Pleasant on the afternoons of Sunday 22 and October 29 for the 20 20 cup.

We are aiming to increase the number of junior playing to a minimum of 24 so we can have regular matches between the junior sides.

In July 2007 we are hoping to have an adults four match tour of the UK and we will certainly be arranging further junior tours to Chile in forthcoming years.

We would be delighted to hear from anyone who is interested in playing cricket, even if it is only for one or two 20 20 matches (which last 3 hours 15 minutes).

Contact Roger Diggle, Derek Reeves or Richard Marlor Training sessions are as follows: indoors - Saturdays 5-6pm at the Leisure Centre (last session 28th October) then outdoor sessions start Wednesday November 1 at the nets on the FICS field. Junior 4-6pm Seniors 6 - dusk.

Endurance in Buenos Aires

THE Royal Navy's Ice Patrol vessel HMS Endurance is in Buenos Aires on a goodwill visit before heading south for the 2006/ 07 Antarctic season, the Argentine press has reported.

This is the third time this year that HMS Endurance has visited Argentina. In March she went into the naval base of Puerto Belgrano for repairs to her main rudder but had to remain longer than expected because of a labour conflict involving civil personnel from the navy, including dry dock workers.

According to the press in Ar-gentina, Captain Nick Lambert's agenda in Buenos Aires includes contacts with Argentine naval authorities, plus an official reception on board to commemorate the anniversary of the battle of Trafalgar

Endurance arrives in the Falk-lands on October 27 for resupply and unloading at Mare Harbour, then heads south on the 31st.

She is due to visit Stanley at the end of November. MP/PN

THE cruise ship season officially kicks off this weekend with the arrival of Nordnorge in Stanley on Sunday

Nordnorge is just one of over 40 vessels that will visit the Is-lands during the 2006-07 season; she will bring 260 passengers during her visit on Sunday.

It's a busy season ahead with more than 200 cruise ship visits scheduled. The largest vessel will be the Golden Princess which can cater for 3,100 passengers and will visit Stanley on January 29, 2007.

Figures released by Customs and Immigration reveal that the Islands can expect approximately 55,000 cruise ship visitors in the coming season (excluding crew members), of which 6,000 will visit Camp

Liz Dimmlich of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board commented, "If these figures are achieved, this will represent an increase of over 10,000 cruise ship visitors, or 18%, on 2005-06 numbers.

The government's Passenger Levy is expected to earn more than

£600,000 for the 2006/07 financial year.

Record cruise numbers forecast

The top five destinations to be visited by cruise ships this season will be Stanley (102 visits), Carcass Island (32 visits), New Island (31 visits), West Point Island (18 visits) and Sea Lion Island (8 visits).

Liz said the Tourist Board is excited about the opportunities in the season ahead, and has lengthened opening hours at the Jetty Visitor's Centre in anticipation of a rush for tourism information.

'Same immigration law for all'

THE Falklands Wool Co-operative, like anyone else, will need to comply with the law on immigration when filling its vacancies, Councillor Robertson has said.

However, she added, the mechanics of how it will manage its staffing arrangements, "will be a matter for them," and not for government members or the staff of the Development Corporation

Penguin News contacted Cllr Robertson after readers expressed concern that immigration requirements were being ignored in the recruitment of a wool trader for the Wool Co-op.

Cllr Robertson commented, "We are all aware that the business plan which forms the basis of the Co-operative, and has been used to market the plan to farmers, has been developed by David Lambert. As such he would appear to be the most logical person to employ to implement it

"If this is the way the Co-op wishes to proceed, they will need to discuss the correct processes with the Principle Immigration Officer who can refer them to the appropriate sections of the Immigration Ordinance."

She added that, according to the Immigration Ordinance, jobs may be required to be advertised locally but it is not an absolute requirement.

The Principle Immigration Officer will no doubt inform the Co-op what procedures they will need to follow, and what is possible within the Ordinance."

Bullying investigation

AN investigation is being conducted into an allegation of bullying within the police force.

Chris Chief Executive Simpkins yesterday said a complaint alleging bullying has been made by a serving officer against another and he confirmed it is being investigated, "...in accordance with established procedures."

A FEW months back my kitchen table was the venue of a rather lively discussion on whether or not whaling, given the increase in numbers in recent years, should be reintroduced in the South Atlantic.

There were strong arguments on both sides - "why shouldn't we look at it as another source of income, so long as it's licenced and strictly controlled," was pitched against, "it's just plain wrong to kill whales, we nearly wiped them out once, we should leave them alone."

It's an interesting debate and one which has reared its head this week with the announcement from Iceland that they are to resume commercial hunting; they will take nine fin whales (an endangered species), and 30 minke whales each year. The country's fisheries ministry has said Iceland is dependent on living marine resources and will keep catches within sustainable limits.

That might sound straight forward but this will impact heavily on the country's main industry - tourism. The Falklands delegation to local this year were fully briefed on the problems licenced whaling can bring a nation, particularly one that relies so heavily on tourism. The manager of a the Husvik Whaling Museum was reportedly on the verge of tears as he told of towns which rely on whale watching visitors who have lost 80% of their customers as people boycott the country on ethical grounds.

So what do Falkland Islanders think about this? Would it be foolish not to consider the controlled and licenced exploitation of another of our natural resources or would the reintroduction of whaling be the downfall of a region where nature is purportedly still in charge?

THE plans by Argentina's Parliamentary Observatory (who thought up that terrible name?) to punish Spanish companies who fish in the Falklands has prompted a number of calls to our office this week from people keen to know how the fishing companies feel. Understandably, no one gave anything away in their responses, most of which were simply "no comment".

I was interested to hear one person - who, to be fair, does not have direct fishing interests - say they thought the move could, in theory, have a detrimental effect upon Argentina. Their take was, if the Spanish don't react the way they want and instead rebel at what is essentially blackmail. Argentina could end up being the disadvantaged party. But I guess we'll just have to wait and see what happens.

I laughed the other day though when chatting about the issue with a visitor to the office, he commented: "Some people in the Falklands drink Coca Cola; are they now going to ban the sale of Coke in Argentina?"



Falklands 'perfect' for photo shoot

THE Falklands has provided the ideal backdrop for the photo shoot of the new Land Rover Freelander.

Speaking to *Penguin News* on Wednesday, photographer Stan Papior said the quality of light in the Islands has been "perfect".

Stan's images are to be used in a major supplement given away with motoring magazine *Autocar*, telling the story of creation of the new Land Rover Freelander.

He has travelled to the Islands with Autocar news editor Dan Stevens and motoring journalist Steve Cropley and two Land Rover representatives. They were accompanied by Stephen Luxton and Paul Anderson of the Falkland Islands Company, the official Land Rover dealer.

The vehicles arrived from Montevideo on Saturday and on Sunday the group headed to Darwin, Goose Green, Bodie Creek Bridge and then to the old Orqueta House in Lafonia.

Steve described Orqueta as "amazing" and added, "It was so interesting to see this stone house and trying to imagine how it got built. The fantastic 360 degree view of the horizon - what a fantastic place to put a house."

On Monday they headed to Paloma beach which meant crossing the Picos, a steep range of mountains. This was a good trial for the vehicles, Steve said, and there were a few boggings.

He was pleased with how the Freelanders performed. "They have been very good. It's very much improved from the previous model which is what we set out to find out.

"We were using it in conditions which are about the limit of what an owner would choose to use the vehicle in. There was plenty of traction, good ground clearance, everything you need."

Off road conditions in the Falklands are completely different from the UK, he said. "With the conditions we normally drive off road

Rockhopper delighted by 'improved clarity on prospects'

ROCKHOPPER Exploration says data from two surveys carried out earlier this year has provided "greater clarity" and "significantly de-risks the acerage."

Executive Chairman, Dr Pierre Jungles, said it is "great news" for the company. "We took a bold step in, just underneath the surface the road is there but where we've been in the Falklands, a lot of the time the stuff we're on is twelve feet thick..."

Dan said the Freelander 2 is a completely new vehicle. "It's not a just a re-skin or restyle with a new engine in. It's a completely new car which shares nothing with the old car."

On Tuesday Autocar held a photo shoot with the Police and their Land Rover Discoveries and the Governor also had the opportunity to test drive the vehicle.

Photographer Stan said he had captured around 800 images in his first three days in the Falklands. Despite less than perfect weather, he said the quality of light had been perfect. "There's so much colour and atmosphere; even the grey, which in the UK is so much flatter.

"And it's always changing - the same picture from the same spot within five minutes can look completely different."

Dan added that the lack of man made features - such as electricity pylons - means the Falklands landscape is "brilliant" to photograph.

Wednesday was spent shooting around town and then, with their deadline looming on Thursday, they filed their final story on Wednesday night.

The article in Autocar, which is part of a 68 page spread, will also give readers an insight into the Falklands of today, Dan said, "...to show it's not all about the war - we want to show how it's changed and show the people here..."

For those who may have hoped to have the chance to buy one of the two new vehicles, they're out of luck as they are to be returned to the UK.

Dan explained, "One is a prototype and the other is a very early production car. They wouldn't be saleable. You're better off getting a later car." The FIC is expecting its first new Freelanders to arrive in March.

Court news

Defence warn of possible delays to police trials

THERE has been a further pre-trial review for Superintendent David Morris and Detective Sergeant Jonathan Butler

Defence lawyer for Mr Morris, Keith Watson, has made it clear in the Senior Magistrate's Court that if admissible evidence relating to the sole charge of perverting the course of justice against his client is to be heard by the same judge who will deal with a further joint charge, he may lodge an appeal causing delays before the trials even begin. Defence lawyer Richard Marlor

Defence lawyer Richard Marlor acting for Mr Butler, who also faces trial following a charge of perverting the course of justice, said that there has been a misunderstanding in so much that he had understood from the outset of proceedings that neither of the two trial judge would hear admissibility charges.

admissibility charges. Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds who has dealt with the administrative matters throughout the lead up to the trials, apologised for any misunderstanding, adding that it has been her "clear understanding" that all matters are to be dealt with by an acting magistrate. Mrs Faulds said that she has not accepted responsibility for anything other than administrative matters: "admissibility goes beyond administration." she said."

Mr Patrick Curran QC is the judge who will deal (but is yet to be sworn in) with the trial for the sole charge against Mr Morris, while Mr Gary Higginbottom will deal in the same way with the second joint charge.

Both defence lawyers said they would have to instruct their counsel and indicated that the arrangements would also be a surprise to them.

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek confirmed that the report from consultant psychiatrist Dr McInemy on Mr Butler had been received. She asked that the defence, in light of the report, give an indication whether they will require the attendance of two Metropolitan Police Officers as witnesses and indicated that it may not be necessary.

Mrs Faulds asked that a decision be made promptly on this matter as it is risking costs

A further pretrial review will take place on October 25 with trials set to begin on November 6 and 13

A TRIAL date has been set for Simon Ladrone De Guevera who has pleaded not guilty to a charge of aiding and abetting the commission of Raul Millares of sexual penetration without consent.

The charge relates to an incident on March 11.

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Chilean national Mr Millares who breached his bail conditions after he had to leave the Islands for medical treatment and failed to return or make contact with his defence lawyer. The Police have however been unable to serve the Defence lawyer Richard Marlor sought permission to withdraw from the case saying he was embarrassed by the lack of instruction and no longer knew if he was acting in his best interests. Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said she was willing to release him and thanked him for his assistance in the matter.

Also in court on Wednesday, a provisional trial date of December 5 was set for Stanley man Dustin Gilson-Clarke who entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of assault occasioning actual bodily harm.

OTs address conservation of history and nature

THE conservation of not only nature but also areas of historic interest was the basis for a UK Overseas Territories (OTs) conference held in Jersey last month.

Environmental Planning Officer, Dominique Giudicelli, attended the event on behalf of the Falklands.

She said the delegates shared their experiences in looking after their biodiversity. "Many of Britain's endemic species are found in the OTs so the UK recognises it is important to look after its biodiversiry."

She said that while the Falklands face different issues from some of the other OTs - "obviously in the Falklands we are fortunate we don't have the development pressures as places such as Gibraltar or the Caribbean" - we have taken good steps forward. "The Falklands are doing really well, particularly given the size of the population, she said."

The bio-security strategy which the Falklands have drawn up is one example. Ms Giudicelli said it is aimed at preventing alien species from being established in the Islands. "This is good for agriculture - think thistles, aquaculture and fisheries and the environment. Rats on remote Islands are the perfect example." More focus is also needed on the conservation of historic areas, Ms Giudicelli believes. "In line with St Helena, we have joined forces to get the British Government to recognise our historic areas are unique, small and vulnerable, like an endemic species. There is no UK funding and help at present to preserve historic areas."

This ties in with a "whole ecosystem approach," she said. "It's recognising humans have a part to play in the environment and how the two can work together. "We've got to look after wild-

"We've got to look after wildlife as well as our built heritage. The environment and humans can work together."

Ms Giudicelli is also working on a bid with South Georgia and Tristan da Cunha to secure European funding for work on albatross and petrels. "The money would be used to deal with invasive species like rats and mice and such as the supermouse on Tristan which eats albatross chicks alive on the nest."

She said working with OTs has been "fascinating" and explained, "we're so diverse yet we have the same issues to face."

While in Jersey, Ms Giudicelli was keen to pass on the Falklands' thanks to Jersey for the provision of housing after the 1982 conflict.

ISLANDS fishing companies are reluctant to speculate on the potential implications of Argentina's proposal to punish Spanish companies which operate in both the Falklands and Argentine fisheries.

Mercopress this week reported on news from Vigoempresas, a Galician internet information agency, that Spanish fishing companies operating in the South Atlantic and with direct or indirect interests in both fisheries are bound to suffer strong financial losses.

The Argentine Fisheries Federal Council has reportedly changed its policy and is introducing a bill which will force companies with fishing interests in the Falklands to cease activities in Argentina.

POBJOY Mint has announced the release of a special stamp issue and souvenir sheet commemorating the 150th Anniversary of the Victoria Cross (VC)

The Falklands issue features the two recipients of the Victoria Cross from the Falklands War, Colonel H Jones who died in the battle for Goose Green, and Sgt Ian McKay, who was killed on Mt Longdon.

According to the Victoria Cross Society, the simple bronze cross has achieved a mystique and standing unlike any other and has become the highest gallantry award in the world and the most difficult to achieve.

3D SEISMIC SURVEY INFORMATION NOTICE

Rockhopper Exploration plc has contracted a 65-day, 3D Seismic Survey, in the North Falklands Basin to commence on Saturday 21"October 2006.

The 3D seismic survey will be undertaken by the survey vessel "CGG LAURENTIAN" radio call sign C6DQ3 (CHARLIE SIX DELTA QUEBEC THREE). The "CGG Laurentian" has a dark blue painted hull and a white superstructure and will be lowing 6 x 6000 metre long seismic streamers. The total width of the streamers deployed will be 600 metres and the distance from the stern of the vessel to the floating tail buoys, will be approximately 6500 metres and indicated by flashing lights. The survey will be conducted in an east/west direction. The survey area is bounded by the following coordinates:

49	21	S	59	23	W

For operational reasons, which may include weather conditions or streamer maintenance, the "CGG Laurentian" may manoeuvre outside of the survey area from time-to-time.

The "CGG Laurentian" will be accompanied throughout the survey period by the Chase Vessel "BRODOSPAS IBIS" radio callsign J8GO4 (JULIET EIGHT GOLF OSCAR FOUR). The "Brodospas Ibis" has a green painted hull and a white superstructure.

All vessels, which intend to transit or steam in proximity of the survey area, are kindly requested to give the "CGG Laurentian" a wide berth at all times. Vessels should not pass within 10 kilometres astern of the "CGG Laurentian", or within a 3 kilometre corridor along either side of the width of the tow (the tow width being approximately 600 metres). The "CGG Laurentian" will broadcast securité messages twice daily at 09:30 local time and 21:30 local time on HF radio 4066.1kHz. Fishing vessels in the vicinity of the survey area should maintain a good listening watch on VHF radio Channel 16 at all times.

Fishing companies, vessel agents and ship managers will be provided with daily position sitreps as soon as the survey commences.

HOW can we reduce the amount of refuse that ends up on Eliza Cove

Tip? That's the question the Public Works Committee pondered at its PWD meeting last week. Maintenance Manager George Burroughs presented a paper to the committee on ways to reduce the amount of non-biodegradable refuse that enters the waste stream, and in turn, prolong the life of Eliza Cove Tip

He is looking at ways to reduce our eco-footprint: "that is the 'scaling back' of the amount of land, resources, etc to support our lifestyle.

The PWD has already been trying to encourage retailers to reduce the number of plastic bags being used (see below) and now they have been looking at the volume of glass bottles that are sold. The lack of access to a commercial recycling scheme means there is only one avenue presently available for the disposal of glass waste landfill.

Mr Burroughs reported, "A survey revealed that a staggering 750,000 beer and wine bottles are disposed of in one year, enough to cover Victory Green to a depth of 75mm

"Clearly we wanted to reduce this volume.

In his paper to the PWD committee, Mr Burroughs examined the use of glass imploders which have been used successfully on cruise ships such as the Queen Mary 2, and Royal Navy ships including HMS Illustrious.

Implosion is a mechanically induced high-speed process that creates a harmonic resonance, resulting in the destruction of glass whilst rendering it 'sharp free

The resulting cullet has a number of uses that the PWD is investigating, Mr Burroughs said,

...including aggregates for concrete and block making, asphalt, pipe bedding, bio filters and 'heat sinks' which store excess heat available during the day and re-circulate it to keep greenhouses warm at night."

The PWD committee were agreed that the purchase of imploders should be explored; the matter will be referred to Executive Council.

Organic waste

Mr Burroughs has also been exploring ways to reduce the amount of organic waste which ends up in landfill, "...and ultimately the amount of green house gases produced ...

His paper explores the use of 'Green Cone Technology', a system that reduces food waste to its natural components of water, carbon dioxide and a small residue. This solar-heated unit takes all cooked and uncooked food waste including meat, fish, bones, dairy products, vegetables and fruit.

Mr Burroughs said he had looked at models under trial in the Scilly Isles and the Orkney Islands. "Both are trialling 'Green Cones' and 'Green Johannas' which are unique closed hot composting containers allowing successful composting through the year.'

He added, "Composting is not new technology and many gardeners have been composting successfully for decades and as such we do not intend to reinvent the wheel, just to oil it a little."

Environmental Planning Officer, Dominique Giudicelli welcomed the composting proposal. She commented, "I have no doubt that these will work as, from personal experience, composting in Stanley seems to work very well despite the climate.

"I welcome this as it will help to reduce waste going to the tip and enrich soil."

... and plastic bag schemes get 'thumbs up'

THE Environmental Planning Officer has praised two local businesses who are running schemes to cut down on the use of plastic bags

Lifestyles and Stanley Garden Centre charge customers 10p for a plastic carrier bag and donate the money to the South Atlantic Medal Association.

Jimmy Moffat from Lifestyles has seen usage of bags drop "significantly" since he introduced the charge, which came about after hearing ideas from George Burroughs on ways to cut down on rubbish both in town and at the tip

Jan Miller of Stanley Garden Centre said she also encourages customers to reuse plastic bags. She commented, "It's amazing how quickly the mind set has changed; everyone's bringing bags now. Everyone has them sitting at home going to waste or even blowing around; this makes much better use of them.

Environmental Planning Officer Dominique Giudicelli is delighted with the steps taken by Lifestyles and the Garden Centre.

"Obviously, I welcome any scheme which might reduce using plastic bags but the fact that this scheme will raise funds for SAMA82 is even better."

She said plastic takes thousands of years to degrade but that | is not all that is bad about the bags: "It looks unsightly and can cause dreadful problems to wildlife when ingested.

She said that since the Irish government introduced a tax on plastic bags, the amount of rubbish laying around has dropped dramatically. "I also understand that a French company has developed new technology to produce a bag using a potato. Starch can be manipulated to that effect and biodegrades without any negative effect on the environment."

Dominique would like to see more cloth bags being used. "They can be great souvenirs. I have quite a few from trips to different holi-

day destinations. "I would love to take some away from the Falklands."

No need for more change

HAVING read both the education consultation document and the article in the last week's Penguin News along with the Editor's comment, I can see where this debate is both coming from and going to.

As a parent who has seen our children work through all levels of the education system and in particular during much of that time living in Camp. I have witnessed the ever changing role of the education system particularly during the last five years.

My wife and I know the pitfalls and difficulties of coping with a special needs child living in a remote place and how extremely supportive the Camp Education system at that time was in having to both teach our three children at different levels and cope with a special needs child. The head of Camp Education was instrumental in getting the family in the best possible situation to help our child's learning difficulties.

Of course this was at a time when the government had more money than it knew what to do with and was very supportive of the education, medical and communication services

While understanding the need for improvement, I do believe that we have been increasingly subject to rather too many changes in our education system and this is having a serious effect on our children

I well remember when the school year change was proposed and eventually accepted because we had to keep in line with UK exam timings. That was a very difficult time for both parents and children and we are still seeing the back lash of that. The expense of a teacher to teach the spill-over of a new class of the year 12 group of children is one example.

To make the matter a whole lot worse the results from the last GCSE exams were worse than in previous years


I strongly feel that this is another case of 'the new broom sweeps cleaner' and, coupled with the now financial difficulties of our government, lends itself nicely to further cost cutting change.

I believe that like so many of the changes we now see on the Islands, this proposal is money driven. It is rubbish to suggest that the different sections of the education department do not fully share their resources with each other and the children - my family is proof that they do, and do it very well.

Everyone is aware of the reduction in numbers of Camp children and there are plenty of good reasons for this - the continued decline of the Camp population which I believe is largely due to so much bureaucracy. I also see the day when there are likely to be many small holdings with a new breed of families who will once again depend on the Camp Education system. History over the last 110 years in Camp shows that there are constant highs and lows of the numbers of children in Camp at any one time.


Why have we had so many brilliant scholars in the past and yet see today's graduates not do so well? Maybe we should be looking at what was being achieved in those days and not seek to tweak the system yet again. We are at a time when Darwin School children, who received very basic education in the sixties and seventies, are in the main running their own successful businesses. Does this not answer the question to the problems we face today?

Coastal shipping and FIDB update Inquest opened into death of Spanish seaman

THE Board of the Development Corporation formally recognised the Government's Chief Executive Chris Simpkins as Acting General Manager (GM) until Mark Brunet the newly appointed GM arrives in January. The Board also approved, "for ease of operation" that Brendan Gara as senior staff member, should be able to approve expenditure between £500 and £5.000 as is usually done by the General Manager.

The next scheduled ferry trip has been cancelled and the issue of payments to farmers who meet the ferry on either side of the Sound (likely to be £100 per month) is being dealt with by Tim Cotter. said Mr Simpkins.

Following a trip to Chile Mr Cotter has reported that repairs to the MV *Tamar* are going well and she is expected to return to the Islands next week.

Mr Simpkins, during his activity report, suggested the possibility of establishing a limited company as a subsidiary of FIDC to operate coastal shipping in the short term, (seven months to take it up to July 2007), which would not change the day to day running but would minimise the financial risks to FIDC.

Board member Mike Forrest expressed concern at the level of FIDC involvement with the issue when it is policy to be "stepping away."

is policy to be "stepping away." He suggested that the contract be put out to tender in the private sector or negotiate with the successful tenderer for the contract to be covered in the short term.

Councillor Richard Cockwell said that previous contractors had worked the old vessel until a new one had arrived however, he thought it would be cumbersome to put something out for tender for such a short time.

Councillor Janet Robertson agreed that the successful tenderer should be approached to see what options could be offered. (Stuart Wallace of Fortuna, who is part of the joint company Workboat Services who have successfully tendered for the coastal shipping contract, declared an interest and left the room for the majority of the discussion).

It was agreed by the Board that the status quo should be retained, pending the possibility of transferring the service to new contractors. It was agreed that in the interim, FIDC staff should explore the possibility of establishing a limited company as a subsidiary of FIDC to operate coastal shipping, thus limiting FIDC's liability.

Lookout spine road

Mr Simpkins said that Morrison (Falklands) commenced work on the Lookout Industrial Estate spine road on September 11 and are on schedule to complete within 11 weeks and on budget of £200,000. FIDC residential properties

FIDC residential properties Saltire decorators have now begun work on the FIDC General Manager's house at 8 Biggs Road. Mr Simpkins said that to utilise the empty property David Lambert may move in temporarily when he returns to the Islands on Saturday.

The flat above the shop Reflections awaits the installation of heating and it is anticipated that this flat will provide longer-term accommodation for Mr Lambert. THE inquest into the death of a Spanish seaman from the trawler *Golden Chicha* was opened and adjourned in the Coroner's Court on Friday.

Jose Manuel Marcial Antepazo (42) was swept into the sea on a fishing net on July 5 when the vessel was pulling a net on board. A hook on a safety cable broke and allowing the net to go back out to sea with Mr Marcial on it.

The Captain of the vessel at the time, Enrique Rudello Portely, told Her Majesty's Coroner Clare Faulds how crew members had been unable to reach Mr Marcial with life saving rings as they were pushed away from the ship by the propeller movement and the current.

He said a Zodiac was immediately put into the water however this operation took some 10 minutes as the ship had to be turned before the inflatable could be launched in the lec.

As Mr Marcial floated on the surface "lots of black birds" attacked him explained the Captain through an interpreter. There were so many birds that the seaman in the water was not visible to the crew and they used the birds as a fix as they turned the ship.

Captain Portely said that Mr Marcial, who was wearing both a hard hat and life jacket and had undergone an obligatory course in Spain to prove he could swim, was unresponsive when he was returned on board the *Golden Chicha*. Both he and another crew mem-

Both he and another crew member confirmed that Mr Marciało had been swept out on top of the net and had not struck any part of the ship with his body that they were aware of.

Mrs Faulds confirmed that she had received the pathologists report and it was the doctors opinion that the cause of death was drowning.

The cause of death was drowning. Reading from the summary. Mrs Faulds said there was a film of haemorrhage to the left side of the brain which indicated an injury to the head which could have been caused by a bird or a blunt instrument that caused unconsciousness but was not fatal.

Mrs Faulds adjourned the inquest to complete formal conclusions and will issue a certificate in due course.

'Beetles about': a boring mystery solved

FALKLANDS Conservation has thanked everyone who contacted them about the mystery longhorn beetles reported in Penguin News last month.

It turns out that live adults were collected from fence posts at Roy Cove some 12 years ago. In addition, Falklands Conservation has been able to collect 15 adults from the Hill Cove region during October. This picture shows a male (identifiable by his 'feathered antennae'), who at about one and a half inches is smaller than the female (which can be greater than two inches in length).

These animals live in the centre of rotten wood and belong to the cerambycid family. They are the largest of all insects known to breed in the Falkland Islands but it has yet to be determined



whether they are naturally occurring (arriving in the Islands in rotting wood floating on the sea) or accidentally introduced in wood shipped to the Islands by man.

However they arrived, these animals can now be found in both East and West Falkland, their apparent rarity only due to the fact that they remain hidden inside fence posts and rotting wood for the majority of their lives.

He is heading south as a part of a team of eight to work on a series for Channel Five and Animal Planet. The programme, which hits UK screens on December 18, is a five hour special to be shown over a week on Five and will then be shown on Animal Planet from January.

Nigel said the programme will focus on spring unfolding in South Georgia: "The main thrust is on the four species of penguins; it's such a lovely time to visit because the penguins are so fat.

"The series will end with the King penguins laying their first egg and the Gentoo chicks hatching."

The timing of the trip is down to nature as well as for commercial reasons: "We're here at this time of year to capture the fun of the penguin courtship and the fact there is an extremely popular animated film coming out called *Happy Feet* with dancing penguins and featuring the voices of Robin Williams and Hugh Jackman."

Due to the short time period between now and when the show will air, an editing suite has been installed on the yacht and footage will be transmitted to the UK while the team are in South Georgia.

Falklands visit

His week in the Falklands was spent at Darwin, Pebble Island, Saunders Island, Sea Lion Island and Stanley.

He always wanted to come to the Islands, Nigel said, because he is an avid birdwatcher and his visit has inspired him to return to film Falklands wildlife. "I was working in the Natural History Unit when *Life in the Freezer* was on and ever since seeing that I've wanted to come: I've spent the last week partly on reconnaissance, mainly holiday, just travelling round the Falklands, which has been an absolute delight.

"Now I'm talking to the Tourist Board about coming here to film early in January."

He said he had met "loads" of friendly people in the Islands and said it is the ideal place to visit: "For people to come here is so easy, you don't have to be an intrepid naturalist, it's a fabulous place and everyone here is so extremely friendly."

He spent his last couple of days in Stanley and took a launch trip, courtesy of Sulivan Shipping Ltd, with fellow birder, Alan Henry, who showed him the ornithological delights of Sparrow Cove and Kidney Island.

Nigel has been a hit with Falklands kids: "I had no idea Prehis-

toric Park was being shown here until every five year old that I met recognised me. While I was on Sea Lion Island there was a very nice boy called Pierre (Giudicelli-Probin) who is a great fan of the series so it was nice spending time with him."

Of his time in the Falklands he commented, "I've really enjoyed it here and I think there's great potential to show people how fantastic it is.

"It really is a home from home and everyone makes you feel so welcome."

He says that fans of *Prehistoric Park* should watch this Sunday's episode, the last in the series, as it is one of which he is particularly proud. "It's called Super Croc, and is about a crocodile that hunted dinosaurs and was filmed on Fraser Island in Australia. The crocodile was 15 metres long; we've all seen natural history films where the Nile Crocodiles leap out of the water and catch a wildebeest but this thing used to leap out at dinosaurs."

He hinted: "In the final episode everything goes wrong in *Prehistoric Park*; it's one of my favourite episodes."

He is also excited about another show - very much in contrast to his dinosaur series - to be aired at Christmas. He explained, "The working title is *Impossible Jour*neys; it's an hour and a half drama where I am shrunk to the size of a pea and attacked by toads and have a ride on a dragon fly.

"It's a great way to get families and children interested in the world at their feet ."

Nigel is due to arrive back in the Falklands in late November.



Radar opens new window into Antarctic ice


SCIENTISTS are getting their first glimpse into the inner secrets of an ice shelf, thanks to the innovative application of a new radar technique developed by British Antarctic Survey (BAS).

Getting a clearer view of how ice behaves is important because it will help scientists predict more accurately how the ice sheet will respond to future climate change. The results are published this week in the Journal of Glaciology.

Using phase-sensitive radar an exceptionally accurate version of the systems used by ships and aircraft to detect objects in their path - Dr Adrian Jenkins and colleagues from BAS studied the internal structure of the enormous Filchner-Ronne Ice Shelf, as well as the rate at which the bottom of the ice shelf is melting.

Lead author Dr Jenkins of BAS commented, "The radar provides an unprecedented insight into the flow of the ice shelf. Internal structures are formed as layers of snow are laid down each year. These layers produce radar reflections that give us a totally new view of the internal workings of an ice sheet.

"This will help us understand how the ice flows and improve our ability to predict how the ice sheet as a whole will evolve in the future, which is important because growth or shrinkage of the ice sheet has a direct impact on global sea level."



As well as shedding new light on the makeup of the ice shelf, Dr Jenkins and his colleagues used the phase-sensitive radar to measure the rate at which the underside of the ice shelf is melting. These are the first-ever direct measurements of ice shelf melting and are extraordinarily accurate.

According to Dr Jenkins, "The new technique allows us to measure centimetre-scale changes in the two-kilometre thickness of the ice. We found that an average of one metre of ice is melted from the bottom of the ice shelf every year.

"At this rate, all the ice lost by melting can be replenished by flow of ice from upstream, so that this part of the ice shelf is showing no signs of change. Elsewhere in Antarctica ice shelves and ice streams are thinning and now we have a tool to measure the thinning rates to unparalleled accuracy."

Human activity and ice shelf collapse linked

The first direct evidence linking human activity to the collapse of Antarctic ice shelves has been published this week in the Journal of Climate.

Scientists from BAS, the Centre for Polar Observation and Modelling, University College London, and the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven in Belgium revealed that stronger westerly winds in the northern Antarctic Peninsula, driven principally by human-induced climate change, are responsible for the marked regional summer warming that led to the retreat and collapse of the northern Larsen Ice Shelf.

Global warming and the ozone hole have changed Antarctic weather patterns such that strengthened westerly winds force warm air eastward over the natural barrier created by the Antarctic Peninsula's two kilometre-high mountain chain. On days when this happens in summer temperatures in the north-east Peninsula warm by around five degrees Celsius, creating the conditions that allowed the drainage of melt-water into crevasses on the Larsen lce Shelf, a key process that led to its break-up in 2002.

Lead author Dr Gareth Marshall from the British Antarctic Survey said, "This is the first time that anyone has been able to demonstrate a physical process directly linking the break-up of the Larsen Ice Shelf to human activity. Climate change does not impact our planet evenly - it changes weather patterns in a complex way that takes detailed research and computer modelling techniques to unravel. "What we've observed at one

"What we've observed at one of the planet's more remote regions is a regional amplifying mechanism that led to the dramatic climate change we see over the Antarctic Peninsula."

As she neared the ACZ the first iceberg was sighted by the Bridge team which led to the ship being brought to a higher state of watertight integrity as a precaution against the very real dangers that even small growlers pose to vessels.

As part of the South Georgia Patrol, Dumbarton Castle had embarked a company from the Roulement Infantry Company (RIC) led by Lt Nick Zorab. This allowed for both a land and maritime patrol of the region to be carried out, demonstrating the ability of the Army and Royal Navy to work well together to achieve a goal.

Once alongside in King Edward Point (KEP), where the ship was greeted warmly by the government officer and members of the British Antarctic Survey team, the RIC proceeded on a series of cold weather training evolutions which four members of Dumbarton Castle's ship's company took part in too

For many this was a once in a lifetime chance to see one of the



few unspoilt parts of the planet with an incredible selection of wildlife.

Dumbarton Castle's programme ensured that all personnel had a chance to go ashore and visit the old whaling station at Grytviken as well as see Shackleton's grave and the re-cently arrived Elephant Seals.

When personnel were required onboard, most of the time was spent clearing snow off the upperdeck as the ship was caught in a very heavy snow storm hours after she arrived.

With the visit almost complete some of the ship's company took the opportunity to carry on a Naval tradition of swimming in the bay at KEP; with the water at a balmy 0.6°C it was an experience will forget.

After leaving KEP, the ship proceeded down the northern coast of the Island carrying out a fishery patrol as well as landing the RIC in Stromness Bay for a two day patrol of the Leith area.

Whilst the RIC were ashore the ship carried out a series of pilotexs exercises for some of the junior members of the navigation department which also allowed Dumbarton Castle to transit through the breath-taking Drygalski Fjord and Gold Bay


With the RIC successfully extracted from Stromness, the ship

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A task upon high

Senior Veterinary Officer Vic Epstein takes a look at hydatids eradication

WHY hasn't hydatids been eradicated in the Falkland Islands?

Hydatids in the Falklands have still been found in the odd sheep liver 20 years after the 'use by date' for eradication. Why is it so? Before I explain the paradox let

me briefly review the life cycle.

The dog has the hydatids worm in its intestine. The worm produces eggs that the dog excretes onto the pasture. The sheep eats the pasture and unfortunately the eggs (so can humans). The worms in the sheep (or human) migrate to the liver or lung and grow into a cyst. The dog eats the cysts when the sheep dies or is killed and the eggs in the cyst grow into worms in the dog's intestines and the cycle starts again.

There are two ways to stop the cycle - don't let the dog eat the cysts (prevent access of offal to the dog) and kill the worms in the dog before they can produce eggs to reinfect the sheep (pilling). This has been going on since 1977 (29 years).

This means that every dog alive today in the Falkland Islands has been 'pilled' every six weeks of its life (unless there is a dog around over 29 years of age!) and in theory have not had access to the sheep to get reinfected.

We also know that the hydatids eggs can probably survive on pasture at best for 200 days. Let's be generous and say a year. If 'pilling' started in 1977 there has been no new eggs for the sheep to injest since 1978 (28 years).

Sheep can be infected life long. The last possible infected sheep should have been infected in 1978 and is now 28 years old! If we assume old sheep are 11 years old by the time they are killed or die then any sheep infected in 1978 should be dead 16 years by now.

New Zealand, with a dog population of 500,000 and Tasmania with a dog population of 50,000 have both eradicated hydatids. Why hasn't the Falkland Islands with a dog population of 632 (last farming statistics)?

A few theories exist. Each has pros and cons

 Non compliance, ie the dogs are not being kept away from infected offal or/ and are not being 'pilled' each six weeks. This could be true. Only the registered dogs are wormed each six weeks under the strict control of Sarah Bowles or her right hand Nyree Heathman. Camp dogs are wormed under an 'honour' system by their owners with pills supplied by the DoA.

However, if non-compliance is true, why is it that last abattoir season, where over 30,000 sheep livers were examined, every one of the five infected livers came from a different, unrelated part of the Falklands. Surely if someone wasn't doing the job all the infected sheep should have come from the same area.

2. There is another host in the Falklands which can keep the hydatids cycle alive? The most likely host is the fox as it has been shown by work in South America that the hydatids worm can infect the fox.

However, if the fox is the culprit why do the sheep on the Islands living with foxes not have heaps of hydatids cysts in their livers? Experience over the last 15 years show the sheep on these islands don't have cysts.

3. The strain of hydatids worm in the Falklands is unique and it's life cycle is different to hydatids found elsewhere in the world.

However some work has been done to find the strain and it appears to be the G1 strain found elsewhere.

4. Introduction of new infections with the importation of new dogs into the Falklands. There are no wild dogs in the Falklands (let me know if I am wrong) and dog importation is under a protocol where it is 'pilled' before arrival or has to swim over from South America.

5. The hydatids worm is resistant to the 'pills.' However resistance has not been found anywhere in the world to-date.

Where are the remaining sources of hydatids coming from? We are looking at all the above aspects to see if this disease can be eradicated once and for all.

The good news is that no new cases have been found in humans in the Falklands since 1977 and there seems to have been a 10 fold decrease in incidence in 1996 with a further 10 fold decrease in 2006. Lets see what the abattoir turns up next year!

A trip down memory lane

Twenty-six years ago, October 23, 1980

THE Argentine Navy moves against Chilean and Polish ships fishing near the Falkland Islands. Earlier in the month a Polish trawler was boarded by a representative of the Argentine navy just some eight miles of Lively Island. The ship was not taken to Argentina as a Chilean trawler had the previous month, but was ordered to leave the area. The captain was told to pass the same command on to the rest of the Polish fleet operating in the region. The Poles consult government authorities in Stanley and at a specially convened Council meeting it is decided to ask the British Government to make a strong protest to the authorities in Buenos Aires concerning the incident. Polish fishing ships continue to conduct operations.

During a routine fuel check by FIGAS engineers it is discovered that fuel for the Beaver aircraft is contaminated with water and dirt. The pilot of the aircraft airborne at the time was informed of the probable condition of his fuel by radio, but as the engine was functioning satisfactorily the flight was continued.

Two graders purchased by government from Johnston Construction Ltd but considered too heavy for local projects are sold on to Chilean business men for £30,000.

Changes to the Argentine state airline LADE scheduled Fokker F-27 flight from midday Friday to Saturday is not welcomed by airport staff. Further changes mean that the twice weekly flights are only on the ground for 30 minutes which means the flight crews cannot get to Stanley where they always spend well in the shops and local businesses are noticing the difference.

Although not confirmed, there is a possibility that a Chilean domestic airline may establish a regular passenger and freight link from Punta Arenas; if it materialises it seems probable that a Piper Navajo aircraft will be used. It is considered unlikely that LADE or Argentine authorities would cooperate with the scheme as they almost certainly wish to retain their monopoly of air transport to and from the Islands.

Nineteen years ago, October 23, 1987

FOUR men are tragically killed in a fire which rages through five decks of the Polish refrigerator ship *Pormorze*. The fire broke out on the main deck of the 13,000 ton vessel anchored in Berkeley Sound and spread rapidly, feeding off empty cardboard cartons. A crew check made immediately after the outbreak of the fire found four of the 140 ships company to be missing. Two bodies were recovered within an hour and the other two the following morning. 
The announcement that FIDC General Manager Simon Armstrong is to leave the Falklands because of an "irreconcilable conflict of personalities" is met with demands by a number of Islanders that there be a public inquiry into the matter which, says *PN* since the official release, has been drawn back under the "familiar cloak of secrecy which shrouds many governmental issues these days."

Housing returns to the news with the announcement of various projects being initiated to alleviate the current shortage of homes. Thirty houses are to be built in the Jersey Estate with units ranging from four bedroomed, three bedroomed and single bedroomed units. The project is expected to take 18 months to complete. Work also begins in the plot near Lookout Camp where 26 houses are to be built following the placing of a contract worth £2.6 million by the Housing Corporation Ltd, a company formed by a consortium of Stanley Fisheries joint venture partners.

Efforts to restructure the government air service continue with key proposals made by Captain Foster awaiting consideration by ExCo. The air service is now operating from the terminal building at Stanley Airfield, as opposed to the portacabin by the hangar and passengers are being issued with tickets to limit both the passengers and airline's liabilities. The announcement that flights are be prepaid is taken as an affront by Mr Sydney Miller who writes to *PN* to express his displeasure at a system, "...which more or less demands cash down before a flight... we do not expect to be treated as though we are trying to dodge paying our dues."

Colin Smith makes darts history after sweeping the board in all the individual events. Wool report - week ending October 13 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

FOR the first time in four weeks greasy wool prices increased at sales in Australia and South Africa.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide", prices încreased by between 5 and 9 pence per kilogram clean for fleece wool lots finer than 24 microns and by between 1 and 3 pence per kilogram for broader lots.

Low vegetable matter skirting types with better style and length gained several pence per kilogram clean in value during the weeks trading while poorer quality lots fin-ished the week "firm". The AWEX "Eastern Market In-dicator" (EMI) finished the week

up 6 pence per kilogram at 298.8 p/kg clean compared to last weeks closing level of 292.4 pence/kg clean

In South Africa 93% of the 4,854 bales on offer were sold. The main buyers during the sale were Modiano with 1335 bales and Chargeurs with 932 bales. In Aus-tralia 89% of the 61.992 bales presented to the trade changed hands Included in the offering were 5,251 bales of crossbred wool of which 86% was sold.

In a similar pattern to South African sale rooms, in Australia, top makers familiar with Falkland Islands wool were very active with

Modiano buying 3062 bales, BWK Elders 3,392 bales and Chargeurs 3,450 bales.

Sales continue next week in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia with a combined offering of almost 90,000 bales.

O WHY is all email destined for FIG being sent off-island for scanning by a third party?

A Our thanks to Computer Co-ordinator Dilys Payne for providing answers to this series of questions.

All cinails from local addresses are at the moment being sent offisland, we are in communication with Cable and Wireless to rectify this, so all local emails will not leave the Falklands. All incoming emails from overseas are being scanned by a third party spam filter and de-leted (if spam) before coming to the Falklands

Does email from govern-ment, destined to Falkland Is-lands email addresses, also go off-island first?

Emails within government do not leave the government server. Emails from government server ple outside of government at present - same as first question. If this is the case, what con-

sideration was given to the im-pact on international band-width by FIG when carrying out this change?

At present there will be a small increase in bandwidth usage by out-going local emails but this is more then balanced out by the reduction of bandwidth used by incoming spam emails (sometimes in excess of 50% of all incoming government emails) which are now blocked How was the service pro-vider chosen?

The reason we chose the spam filter we have, is because it is gen-erally considered the largest and best in the world, boasting a 95% catch rate of all spain. Our contract with this service provider is reviewed on a remule back.

a regular basis Did this go out to tender? We did not consider tender to be a viable option in this case and went for quality of service and guarantee of security

 ${f Q}$ Following the reply from BFBS a few weeks ago regard-ing digital TV, will the Falkland Islands Government give us the choice as to whether we would like to receive and pay for BFBS digital TV ourselves when it arrives?

A Councillor Mike Summers provided this response.

It has to be stressed that BFBS is in the very early stages of discussions with FIG about this; we do not yet know what the possible options are.

In respect of direct purchase that would be a matter for BFBS. but even if it is technically possible it may well fall outside their permitted remit as a Forces provider. That is a matter for them to advise.

FIG will try to ensure that as many options as possible are left open, whilst seeking to ensure that all of the Falklands is adequately served.

O Who decides what we watch on BFBS?

A Our thanks to BFBS Station Manager, Damian Watson, for this answer

As with all broadcasting organi-sations, BFBS TV programmes are scheduled by an experienced, pro-fessional team of people who work to strict rights issue and financial guidelines.

In the case of BFBS TV, the final decision on which of the available programmes to schedule rests with a Senior Programme Organiser, reporting to the Controller Tel-evision at BFBS headquarters in the UK.

The programmes are directed at a British Forces audience in a number of different time zones around the world and comprise home grown programmes such as BFBS Reports and Room 785 alongside the broadest spectrum of programming cur-rently available from terrestrial and satellite broadcasters in the UK.

O Is there a legal age, or any recommendations for children who baby-sit for younger children. If so what are they and are there any limits to the age and amount of children one youngster can care for?

A Crown Counsel Ros Cheek provided the following information.

The Employment of Children Ordinance prohibits the employment of any child under the age of 14

There are various restrictions on the hours and type of work that a child may undertake from the age of 14, but those restrictions do not apply to babysitting being under-taken by a child of 14 or over.

There is no legally defined limit for the number of children who may be cared for by any babysiter, nor is there a legally defined limit for the age of the children who may be cared for by a babysitter who in the children who is themself a child. However, leaving children in the care of another child may amount to neglect if the child who is the babysitter is not of sufficient age or maturity to cope with the responsibility in the circumstances. In that case, the Social Work Department may become involved in the child protection is-sues involving the children who need to be cared for. Of course there may also be child protection issues involving the child who is the babysitter.

Social Services Team Leader

Vikki Butler added: "Every situation needs looking at on its own merits. We wouldn't recommend anyone under the age of 14 baby-sitting but the time of day, length of care period, age of child being cared for, age of child doing the caring etc, would all be taken into consideration.

"If a child of 14 is caring for a child the parent is still responsible for their child should anything go wrong.

"Anyone who wishes to baby-sit would benefit from an organised course i.e. a baby-sitting course as held at FICS earlier this year or a first aid course."

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Redundancies at C&W

EMPLOYEES of Cable and Wireless plc have been shocked by news of redundancies within the сотралу

Following an announcement from Cable and Wireless International this week that a new subsidiary company is to be established for St Helena, Ascension and the Falklands, a small number of employees in the company's branch here have been made redundant.

The new company, Cable and Wireless (South Atlantic) Ltd is scheduled to come into being on December 1, 2006.

Penguin News believes up to six people have been made redundant within the Cable and Wireless operation in the Falklands however the company would not confirm or deny this.

Brian Summers of Cable and Wireless in the Falklands said, "We are talking to our staff about the implications for resources. It would be wrong to announce anything before we have discussed it with them and come to decisions."

However Penguin News contacted some of the individuals who were rumoured to have been made redundant and two confirmed it was true. Nobby Clarke, who has worked for Cable and Wireless for 13 years in the maintenance section, confirmed he has been made redundant and that he is happy with the situation. "I'm looking forward to doing something new," he commented, adding that tour driving was on his list of things to do: "it will be good to meet new people." Watch Keeper Phil Barker was

not so happy with the redundancy news. He said he was not given a choice and that it came as a "complete surprise."

"The day before yesterday I had a job and now I don't, " Mr Barker said.

New company

Richard Dodd, Cable and Wireless International (CWI) Director for Monaco and Islands, said the establishment of the new company would "align" the South Atlantic businesses with the CWI strategy.

The change will strengthen our ability to offer modern and sustainable telecoms services," said Mr Dodd. "It will reinforce our posttion in each of the three territories (Ascension, St Helena and the Falklands) so that we can plan the sus-

tainable development of the new stakeholders." our

He said CWI is giving itself the flexibility to take advantage of future developments, "whether they are technical or regulatory.

The three business units will in future be run as a single company with increased autonomy and local decision-making power, according to Mr Dodd "They will be more able to share skills and experience, as well as develop new processes to meet customer expectations and provide an enhanced customer experience.

He said that as CWI implements these changes there will be no disruption to the service provided to customers.

Complaints system needed: Governor

THE Governor believes a "properly constituted" system for handling complaints against members of the public service needs to be established

followed His words an investigation into formal complaints made against the Chief Executive, Mr Chris Simpkins, by the former Headteacher of the Community School, Mr Alan Purvis.

Mr Purvis' grievances, lodged in July and September 2006, were about the way in which a complaint against him as Headteacher of the Community School, made by a parent and a guardian of a pupil at

the school, had been handled. After seeing Mr Purvis on Sep-tember 22, His Excellency the Governor, Mr Alan Huckle, appointed Mr Keith Biles to review the cir-cumstances of the complaint and to report back to him. Yesterday he commented, "I have now received his report and have made it available in full (and in confidence) to the Chief Executive and to Mr Purvis

Having noted Mr Biles' views on Mr Purvis' complaints Mr Huckle said he intends to take no further action on them.

However he added that the review highlights the need for "set-ting up a properly constituted sys-tem for handling complaints against members of the public service (including staff within the schools system).

He has asked the Chief Execu-tive, "as a matter of priority", to bring forward the work that he had already commissioned in this re-gard, "... which should include consideration of the possibility of establishing a post of Commissioner of Complaints, so that the matter can go to councillors prior to dis-cussion in Executive Council in December

He explained, "Might there be greater economic returns on investing some of the reserve in our own economy (eg development of aquaculture, fisheries, tourism, port infrastructure, etc) than is achieved by investing it in other people's economies

through investment of reserves (that currently yield around 8%)?" He said councillors asked whether the FCO economic advisor might visit and provide a view. The FCO offered to fund the second person to provide greater

depth. So, should we be spending the reserves? Councillors do not necessarily think this, Mr Summers said, but added, "...we would like a second opinion on whether our current reserves policy is economically sound."

Penguin News asked Councillor Summers if the move to consult the economists was due to pressure to construct a new government ad-ministration building. He com-mented, "There is no pressure from any outside agency or from anyone else to invest the reserves, and it has nothing to do with the proposal for an administration build-

ing. "It is simply that we do not currently employ an Economic Advisor, and wish to seek advice on the current policy as it stands from an economic perspective." He added, "We are under no ob-

ligation to accept any advice given or to make any changes to our current policy.

Visiting economists to examine government reserves

WHAT is the appropriate level at which the government's reserves should be set?

Two economic consultants are due to visit the Falklands next week to examine this question.

Damian Reeves, the economic advisor for the Overseas Territories Department of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO), will visit with Mark Watson, an independent economic consultant, following a discussion during the May budget session by councillors on the government's overall financial strategy, particularly with regard to the level of reserves.

Councillor Mike Summers said the government has for some years adopted a strategy of maintaining reserves at a level of 2.5 times current operating expenditure and this is in the Islands Plan. "The origin of this target has no particular eco-nomic justification; it was a figure

SITTING quietly in a corner at Tuesday evening's public meeting, had I succumbed to the urge to bang my head on the 'press desk', I expect a number of others there would have joined me.

No one was talking nonsense or being unreasonable - there were good ideas contained in the presentation from Mrs Booth and likewise important points were made from the public floor - and everyone agreed that the quality of education in the Falkland Islands is of paramount importance.

However, my frustration - and that of others, I expect- stemmed from the fact that this was the first time teachers had been given a proper opportunity to discuss and comment on the ideas for the restructuring of education.

None of the particulars behind the structure have yet been decided: according to Mrs Booth and the councillors, meetings will now be held with teachers and others involved in education to hammer out the detail.

It seems a rather back to front way of doing things. Surely consultation with teachers should have preceded any public discussion?

This whole issue seems to have been badly handled. Apparently the three education councillors went to Mrs Booth (when she was very new to the Falklands) with their concerns about a number of issues and what they saw as objectives for education in the Falklands - issues and objectives which were outlined by Mrs Booth in her presentation on Tuesday.

The fact that teachers at the meeting were able to very quickly report how some of the issues were already in hand, to me summed up the problem.

Why on earth wasn't a bit of research done by those three councillors ie, visiting the schools/Camp Ed/Training Centre and actually talking to teachers - before heaping these demands on the Director of Education.

As for parental concerns which they said prompted some of the suggestions. I question the validity of this - you could count on one hand the number of non-teaching parents at that meeting.

As a layperson, it seemed to me that so many of the issues that apparently need to be addressed can be tackled, not through a major restructure, but through better communication. How often, for instance, do teachers from IJS, FICS and Camp Ed actually have the chance to get to mutually discuss how they can better work together?

These are intelligent people who want the best for their schools and their students and who will have a very good idea what provision needs to be made for their career progression - and to what degree this is actually important to them. They should have been consulted well before the issue was opened for public debate on what are, at the moment, vague plans.

No one is complaining about the call for change; but we do need to be cautious about change for change's sake.



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A FALKLAND Islander has been appointed as the next Principal Crown Counsel.

Ros Cheek, who has been one of the two Crown Counsel since February 2000 will take up her promotion in November.

The move follows the retirement of David Lang QC, who has been the Attorney General since June 7, 1987.

He will be succeeded by Melanie Chilton who has been Principal Crown Counsel in the Attorney General's Chambers for the past two years. Mrs Chilton will also succeed David as Attorney General for South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands.

Ms Cheek will succeed Mrs Chilton as Principal Crown Counsel with effect from November 1.

Ms Cheek joined the Attorney General's Chambers following professional qualification and training as a solicitor in England and a short period in practice there.

Of her new role she commented, "I am honoured to be offered the opportunity to serve the Falkland Islands in the position of Principal Crown Counsel and I hope that I can meet the challenges of the position.

"I also hope that my appointment might be seen as recognition of what can be achieved with the benefit of a Falkland Islands education, and may inspire other young Falkland Islanders to aim for positions of responsibility within their own community."

Ms Cheek hopes to be able to allocate more of her time to legislative drafting. While on second-ment in New Zealand earlier this year she studied techniques of plain language drafting. So can we look

forward to this approach? She commented, "Any change to drafting styles within the department will be made in consultation with Melanie Chilton as Attorney General, but I would like to implement techniques of plain language drafting that I learned in New Zealand. Improvements could be implemented quite quickly." However she added, "Laws of-

ten have to convey a complex subject matter, so plain language drafting should not be understood to mean that the law will always be simplified.

Ease of public access to the law is something that Ms Cheek is keen to promote. "Falkland Islanders are entitled to ease of access to their laws in order that they can understand what obligations the law requires of them and what rights they are entitled to under the law.

"Part of the process of improving accessibility involves writing laws that are easier to understand, but it also involves making access to the law physically easier, for example, by making laws available on the internet. That might be some way off for the Falkland Islands, but is something that I would love to see made available in the future

Morrison's new Antarctic challenge

CONSTRUCTION firm Morrison (Falklands) Ltd has been awarded a contract in Antarctica.

The company, which is part of the Galliford Try group, has been awarded the £22m contract to manage the design and construction of the Halley VI research station in Antarctica for the British Antarctic Survey. The work will also include demonstron of the station it replaces, Halley V.


Construction will take place over the next three austral summer seasons, starting in November 2007 and completing in 2010. The designers are Faber Maunsell and Hugh Broughton Architects who won a contest to develop the best concept last year.

The structure will consist of two platforms comprising seven interconnected single-storey modules and one double-storey module which are raised on hydraulically jackable legs supported on skis. The northern module comprises the living quarters and the southern will be used for scientific activities.

Putting the building on hydraulic legs and skis means that it can be relocated relatively easily and prevented from being buried in snow," said Chris Luker, Regional Manager for Morrison (Falklands) Ltd.

"This is an innovative change to previous designs and will pro-long the life of the station unlike its predecessors. The idea is for the station to be a visitor to Antarc-

tica, not a resident." The modules will be formed from lightweight structural steel frames. The outer shell will be clad with highly insulated prefabricated

GRP sandwich panels. Plant will be housed separately in two energy modules at the ends of the chain. giving good acoustic and fire separation. The main social space is a special, two-storey module with kitchen, dining room and recreational spaces.

Located on the Brunt Ice Shelf, the structure will be erected on floating ice 200m thick which moves 400m towards the sea every year. The new buildings will have to cope with a 1.5m depth of snow which accumulates annually

Morrison (Falklands) Ltd has completed over 30 jobs worth more than £25m under a framework agreement for the British Antarctic Survey since establishing the niche business in 1998.

From co-operative to limited company

THE Wool Co-op is now to be set up as a limited company.

David Lambert will provide instructions on shareholders' behalf.

It was agreed at the Falklands Landholdings (FLH) board meeting on Tuesday that Owen Summers would take the FLH seat on the board of the Wool Co-op. As the director in charge of wool sales Mr Summers said he would be "wary" of anyone else being on the board to represent FLH.

Mr Summers said that he talked with Mr Lambert who reported positive feedback from buyers and hopes now to progress with organics.

Board member Councillor Mike Summers questioned if shares in the limited company would be tradeable, however it was not known if this would be possible. He also asked whether other farms can become shareholders at a later date; Chief Executive Chris Simpkins said it has been made clear to Mr Lambert that the company is to be set up in a manner to allow people to join later without penalty.

In response to concerns that time was moving on, Owen Summers said that it was anticipated that things would start moving very soon, adding that it would have been more beneficial if Mr Lambert had not left the Islands when he did.

Ben Berntsen concluded that momentum had been lost somewhat "after all the hassle of getting it approved."

Mr Lambert told *FIRS* this week that he hoped the company would be incorporated within two weeks. He said the ordinance in the Falklands for limited companies suits the needs better than those for co-operatives.

"The Attorney General agrees with me, however, that structure of the company is eminently suitable for our requirements and to all intents and purposes the values, aims and rules of the company will be completely aligned with those of a co-operative, strongly focussed on benefiting each member farmer."

Funding granted for invasive species project

THE St Helena Government, in partnership with the governments of the Falkland Islands and South Georgia, has been awarded £1.3 million pounds from the European Commission to support a regional project which aims to protect the rich native biological diversity of the South Atlantic by reducing the threat of introduced invasive species.

It involves St Helena, the Falklands, Ascension, Tristan da Cunha and South Georgia, and officially started operation on October 1.

The Royal Society for the Protection of Birds will manage the project on behalf of the Territories.

In the Falklands tourists like to see unique wildlife, especially the endemic species such as Cobb's wren and the Falklands steamer duck that are found nowhere else in the world. However, invasive animals such as rats and mice have caused reductions in the populations of some species – such as Cobb's wren, which cannot survive in the presence of rats.

Invasive plants are also a concern more than one third of plants growing in the Falklands have been introduced since humans first came to the Islands

Most have been beneficial for agriculture and public amenity, but some such as the Spear Thistle are invasive and alter the structure of natural vegetation. These plants are pests both for conservationists and for farmers as they can reduce grazing quality of pastures, livestock health, and fleece quality.

The first steps in getting the project into action in the Falklands will be the appointment of a project officer to be based in Stanley, an assessment of the status of invasive species in the Falklands and the development of an action plan for invasive species which will be implemented over the three year duration of the project.

A second project officer is to be appointed in St Helena.

Teachers express frustration and concern

TEACHERS have expressed their frustration and concern over the proposed restructuring of the Education Department

A public meeting held on Tuesday evening was a lively affair attended by more than 40 people, most of whom work within the Education Department.

Opening the meeting, Director of Education, Barbara Booth, outlined a number of issues behind the proposed restructuring of the department. The issues, which had been raised by the three councillors with responsibility for education, included a lack of career structure for staff, insufficient provision of adult education and a dissatisfaction with the criteria, range and cost of education for people aged 16 years and over.

Mrs Booth said there were concerns about a lack of coherence and consistency between the various areas of the education system and about a lack of transition arrangements between primary and secondary school.

A number of the points raised within Mrs Booth's presentation were questioned by the teachers present. One said "a lot of assumptions" had been made, some of which were "offensive".

A lack of consultation within the Education Department concerned some at the meeting but Councillor Janet Robertson said the framework for the structure proposals had to be created before the consultation could take place. Mrs Booth stressed that the proposals are just that and consultation will now take place with teachers.

When asked about job losses, Councillor Richard Stevens said this was not planned but that if it did happen, the government would be required to follow the procedure for offering other positions of employment. Local soldiers test Mount Pleasant defences

The exercise takes place every four months and allows units to confirm their plans and procedures and in particular, practice their ground defence tactics.

The FIDF played a key role in last week's activities; a number of them worked in cooperation with the exercising elements, whilst others provided small teams to test the reaction of defences at MPC

Lt Justin McPhee, FIDF Liatson Officer for Cape Petrel, explained, "The exercise offered a great opportunity for the FIDF. Our patrols were highly successful and we practiced small unit tacties in realistic conditions.

"Tying in with this exercise gave us the chance to go up against thermal imaging devices, observation posts and live patrols.

"Our involvement was of benefit to both the BFSAI troops and ourselves and liaison with the BFSAI headquarters was very good throughout. We learned valuable lessons about the defence of the area and our local knowledge has improved as a result."

Throughout the week, BFSA1 tests its response to a fictional exercise scenario that is designed to provide training and experience for all of those taking part. "As well as maintaining the readiness of the forces, it also delivers training that will stand individuals in good stead for the appointments and operational theatres they may deploy to in the future," a military spokesperson said.

Major Mike Reynolds, Exercise Controller said. "Including the FIDF in our exercises cements relationships between both parties and provides the troops here with very useful training. "I would like to thank all of

Preliminary matters referred to trial judges

THE SENIOR Magistrate Clare Faulds has referred the matter of admissible evidence being heard for the trials of Detective Sergeant Jonathan Butler and Chief of Police Dave Morris to the trial judges due to arrive in the Islands in the first week of November.

Keith Watson, defence lawyer for Mr Morris, submitted in writing to the court that preliminary matters in the trials should be heard by a different tribunal than the one that will hear the trials.

"Justice must be done," said Mr Watson, adding that someone determining the case having seen inadmissible evidence could be viewed as being unavoidably prejudiced by the evidence therefore preventing a fair trial. The shortness of the trial judge's visit means that any preliminary matter ought to be heard before his arrival, he said.

Mr Watson submitted that, "as was originally agreed," the preliminary matters should be heard by the resident Senior Magistrate and the visiting judges to hear, separately, the two trials. "In practise this would not cause any inconvenience and would in fact make much sense," he said.

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek submitted on behalf of Prosecuting Counsel Peter Cooke that admissibility should be determined in each trial by the acting Senior Magistrates engaged to try that case, an approach which mirrors the standard procedure in the Falkland Islands Magistrate's Court.

Ms Check said the sensitivity of the case and in particular the nature of Mr Morris's defence, which is to suggest that he is the victim of a government conspiracy to oust him from his post, is such that the cases being tried by acting Senior Magistrates is appropriate.

She said that the Senior Magistrate should be kept distant from the subject matter of the cases given the inevitable and potentially embarrassing proximity with which she has worked in recent years with the defendants and many central witnesses in the case, as well as government officials who may be implicated in the plot alleged by Mr Morris.

Mrs Faulds said she would refer the matter to the trial judges because she did not think it appropriate for her to do so.

Richard Marlor acting for Mr Butler told the court that it was no longer his client's intention to challenge the evidence of two Metropolitan Police Officers adding however that it is still the case that Mr Butler was under stress when interviewed and care should have been taken.

Year 12 do their bit for the environment

Shackleton Scholar delves into Catholic archives

THE history and development of the Roman Catholic Church in the Falklands is the topic of research by a Shackleton Scholar visiting the Islands.

Edward Walsh is spending this and next week working through old letter books and other collections from the archives of St Mary's Church, the government and the Falkland Islands Company. He said that during his research here he is constantly, "...picking up things which you just don't expect to find." Mr Walsh has already un-

Mr Walsh has already unearthed some important material from the National Archives in London and has done in depth research on several of the people associated with the original establishment of the church, such as Thomas Havers, one of the early FIC Colonial Managers who campaigned to have a priest in the Falklands, and Father Foran, one of the first priests to serve.

Going through the despatch books, he has also been interested in the Catholic relationship with the other churches and this has led him to do work on some of the Protestant ministers who were around at the time, particularly Henry Lory who was here in the early 1870s.

Mr Walsh said Governor D'Arcy (1870-1876) did a lot to encourage the establishment of the Roman Catholic Church in the Islands - the first Roman Catholic chapel was built during his governorship - and arranged government support for Catholics and Non-Conformists as well as Protestants. Mr Walsh has been following up the correspondence involved.

Government archivist Jane Cameron described Mr Walsh as an "indefatigable researcher" to whom distance is no object - "as well as travelling a lot in Britain and Ireland, he has followed up leads in the USA, South America, Australia and Rome."

Mr Walsh has written articles for learned Catholic history magazines and has also produced some of the entries in former Governor, David Tatham's book *Dictionary* of Falklands Biography.

Missing boat found on First Passage Island

THE wreckage of a small fibreglass yacht which disappeared earlier this year has been discovered on a western island.

The broken pieces of Frenchregistered yacht *Moustique* were discovered last Thursday on Passage Island by Leiv Poncet of Beaver Island, who is making his way to Stanley by kayak.

Leiv said he found a piece of wreckage upon which the yacht's name was clearly visible.

The police have contacted the family of Antoine Duguet who went missing after leaving Punta Arenas on March 1 bound for Puerto Deseado.

The last reported contact from Mr Duguet was on March 8 when he made an Iridium phone call to his family to gain a weather forecast. Nothing was heard from him after that date. *Moustique* was spotted on March 19 by an Argentine fishing boat. The cockpit door was open and the yacht was full of sea water; no one was seen on board.

Leiv said he was familiar with Moustique's disappearance and added, "I didn't know the guy but I know people who do know him."

Inspector Len McGill confirmed on Monday that he plans to visit the area, once permission has been obtained from the land owner, "...with a view to searching the wreckage and associated areas for personal items and any indication as to what may have happened." He added, "I would also wish to satisfy myself that there are no human remains to be recovered."

He said part of the planning process will be decisions on what to do with the wreckage and if any of it should be recovered. "Given the isolated position of the wreckage it is not a simple task even to visit the area."

Camp workshop: looking at longer term solutions

COUNCILLORS confirmed their committment to improving the economy of Camp, during a workshop held last week.

Following the short term measures to provide financial assistance to the farming community which were introduced as part of the prepa-ration of 2006/07 budget, councillors held last week's workshop to consider longer term measures

They were advised that 44% of farms had taken advantage of the mortgana internet the line. mortgage interest 'holiday' at a cost of £85,500. Only five farms on which FIG or FIDC held mortgages had not participated in the scheme. In contrast, only one farm with a private sector mortgage had applied to join the scheme. Fourteen of the participating farms had opted to continue making repayments in order to reduce the term of their loan

The Department of Agriculture advised that, as planned, the government had met the cost of inter-nal wool freight for the last wool clip and that there had been a good response to changes in the rules which allowed more flexibility in the use of Agricultural Labour Scheme funds. According to a press release from Gilbert House, "All in all, the short term measures had been welcomed and had made a positive impact

Councillors have agreed that they will not be minded to repeat the short term measures next year but that effort should be concentrated in "achieving increases in agricultural productivity and farm incomes by promoting greater commitment to the National Agricultural Business Plan." the statement outlined.

The following measures are now to be developed for further consideration

improving the quality of communications

identifying ways in which land in Camp which is suitable for housing development might be purchased by FIG so that it can facilitate the

growth of the Camp population: exploring, with the Falkland Islands Meat Company the expansion of new local markets - particularly for beef;

continuing to permit on-farm work eligible for Labour Scheme grants;

making access to Agriculture Department grant schemes conditional upon participation in training and development activities and production of farm accounts;

tailored packages of assistance will be developed for 'failing' farms where the owner wants to leave farming as an owner/manager;

access to investment finance at low rates of interest;

the replacement of dedicated marketing skills within FIDC; and possible tax incentives.

Councillor Ian Hansen, who holds the portfolio for the Camp economy commented,....There is no doubt that the short term measures introduced earlier this year have been very welcome. Farms continue to diversify wherever possible and tourism has made a big difference to some. That trend needs to continue

He added. "FIG remains totally committed to following the Agricultural Business Plan and so the challenge now is to encourage wider participation and more rapid progress. We firmly believe that there is great potential

"We also accept that a very small number of farms continue to find it impossible to make ends meet and FIG will, if requested, work with them to find long term solutions.

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Wildlife guide hits its target audience

AS MANY people in the Falkland Islands are making their final preparations for the approaching tourism season, what are most of the cruise vessel passengers, land-based tourists, and family and friends, doing right now? You can bet most are poring excitedly over the books and websites about the Falkland Islands, South Georgia and the Antarctic.

Visitors to the Falkland Islands will now be more prepared during the 2006/07 season than ever before with the winter release of an updated version of Debbie Summers' A Visitor's Guide to the Falkland Islands, published by Falklands Conservation, and WildGuides' Birds and Mammals of the Falkland Islands, written by long-time Falklands-supporters Robin (pictured right) and Anne Woods

While most of us have an admiration for our feathered companions, only a handful has any natural ability to twitch like a true pro. But with a mere 70 breeding birds listed for the Falkland Islands and 227 bird species in total ever sighted on land and in the surrounding waters, its not an insurmountable task to get to know most of them.

If Robin and Anne Woods' wanted Birds and Mammals of the Falkland Islands to be like having an encouraging teacher by your side. they have achieved it. Birds and Mammals of the Falkland Islands takes a gentle, patient approach, with the clever choice of the beautiful images of local photographer Alan Henry alongside the text rather than often mis-leading line drawing

There is often more than one image for each species, which shows all the differences with age.



gender, time of year and colour form. Alan Henry obviously has one of the best photographic catalogues of Falklands wildlife and more of

his work deserves a public viewing. Isles of Scilly Wildlife Tour Guide Will Wagstaff, who has been bringing visitors to the Falkland Islands since 1994, is equally enthusiastic. "This is a superb book - it made me realise that there is a lot to learn about the Islands and yet more wildlife to see'

A hardback book with over 100 photos and informative text about the Islands, the environment, birds, whales, seals and introduced mammals, it's a steal at less than £15

You should think about getting your copy before the tourists start arriving en masse. There's probably going to be more than one visitor to Gypsy Cove this summer with a copy of Birds and Mammals of the Falkland Islands confidently distinguishing between Black-chinned siskins and Black-throated finches. Have your say on the future of the historic dockyard

A PAPER outlining how the Government Dockyard could be developed as a heritage centre is now available for public comment.

The Dockyard has long been recognised as a site of historic importance and an area that would be well suited for a heritage based development and the Environmental Planning Department - with input from the Museum and National Trust (MNT) - has produced a Draft Development Brief to show how this area

could be developed. Museum Manager Leona Roberts said the brief provides clear plans for the Dockyard as part of a wider plan to look at ways to enhance the thistoric centre' of Stanley both in appearance and in land use.

She commented. "As the land and buildings are in public ownership it is important that the community is involved in supporting plans and both the Museum and the Environmental Planning Department (EPD) welcome any comments you might have about this document

Site History

In 1844, the chief town of the Falklands was moved from Port Louis to a new location near Port William. The move was undertaken by the first Governor, Richard Clement Moody.

Among the first buildings to be erected in Stanley were those of the Government Dockyard. These included storehouses, a gaol, a cottage, a smithy, a boathouse, a court house and carpenters workshop. "It is the original half dozen buildings that are of greatest historical importance, offering a glimpse into the life of the first settlers in Stanley," Mrs Roberts said

The original Government Building Book, dated September 1848, describes the details of these buildings which remain largely unchanged to this day.

Heritage Centre

Several years ago the Museum and National Trust began putting forward plans to develop the area as a heritage centre/historic dockyard, a movewhich will involve relocating the Museum to the Dockyard.

Mrs Roberts explained. "While the key to the development will be the conversion of the old Central Store building into a central museum. the plan involves using many of the small outbuildings in the Dockyard.

The MNT believes that the development will benefit the whole of Stanley, greatly improving the appearance of the centre of town and allowing residents and tourists better access to the history and heritage of the Falklands.'

She added, "It should also be noted that the Museum cannot develop much further in its current location at Britannia House - with inadequate storage and no space for improving or expanding displays, the Trust is strictly limited in what it is able to do.

"Developing the Dockyard would be a massive venture but one with many benefits - ranging from aesthetic

to financial. It would be an important step in the development of Stanley, with potentially far-reaching consequences.'

The way forward The Draft Development Brief has

been prepared to:


(1) Try to give a vision of how the area might change in the future. This vision is to secure a high quality development that will enhance this part of Stanley, contributing to the vitality, economy and townscape of the town

(2) Give guidance for future development of the Government Dockyard. This includes current proposals by the Museum Trust to develop the site as a heritage centre. The Trust has a major role to play in the future of the area

Mrs Roberts said. "The brief is available in paper form or on CD from the Museum or the Environmental Planning Department please drop in to collect a copy Written comments should reach the Environmental Planning Department or the Museum before Monday.

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

Horsey crowd turn tractor-drivers

Falkland Islander Lisa Johnston writes of her adventures at Akrotiri Saddle Club in Cyprus.

"She's gone country, look't dem boots, she's gone country, back to her roots..." Alan Jackson IT'S official. I'm a tractor driver.

IT'S official. I'm a tractor driver. Well sure it's not a full-size onc, but I'm sure if it was I'd drive it with just as much style.

In actual fact our titchy runaround comes under the jurisdiction of the grooms, but what with the current staff shortage, managers have been given the go ahead to leap joyously aboard and thunder around the paddocks, revving through the sand, bouncing hay bales out of the trailer.

And what a sight it is: without meaning to be rude. a few of our staff can only be described as 'amply endowed' in the chest department. So imagine if you will, a tiny tractor piloted by a Rubenesque forces wife; over extremely uneven ground. Believe me it's not only the hay bales bouncing.

Quite apart from such entertainment (which could also explain why the pony club Dads keep hanging round 'til feeding time) it's amazing to see the personality change that overtakes a woman when she climbs into a tractor seat.

Honestly, you can almost see the explosion of testosterone. Eyes glaze over as images of cattle ranching, cowpoke ponies and rolling fields of hay. flood tractorfuelled imaginations. I swear, give us a couple of weeks and we'll all be chewin' baccy and singing 'Mommas don't let your babies grow up to be cowboys'.

But enough of such fantasies... with the torturous heat of summer a painful memory behind us. temperatures have slipped to a far more bearable. gentle warmth enlivened only by incredible lightning storms that occasionally leave the entire area in power-cut darkness. Oddly enough this wet season is the one best suited to horse-lovers in Cyprus. Tacking up no longer involves wiping salty, sweat out of squinting eyes or fighting to slide soggy, swollen legs into too-tight jodpurs. plus the ground softens enough to enable you to ride faster than a slow walk without your horse's tendons popping.

Not surprisingly the horses too loathed plodding around the arena in ridiculously high temperatures and would entertain themselves by coming up with new and ingenious ways to shorten lesson times. While the old favourite - break

While the old favourite - break into fast canter and then swerve around the riding instructor causing roaring child to be launched over pony's shoulder - always goes down well with the rest of the class, my favourite has to be the speciality of our fat. part geld. *Bilbo*.

This little star cleverly waits until another instructor innocently opens the riding school gate and then like a flash he begins trotting sideways towards it with all the aplomb of a top dressage horse demonstrating some fancy lateral work. Despite the determined little dear on top kicking, whipping, dragging on the rein and screeching with fury, *Bilbo* simply grips the bit in his smirking mouth, rubbernecks until his nose is on the rider's knee and gradually speeds into a sideways canter, only straightening to shoot through the gate onto the yard and plunge into the wheelbarrows - which in turn topple over in a kind of domino effect, further terrifying the kid now crying in the saddle.

IN THE absence of Councillor Richard Davies, the chair at last week's Planning and Building meeting was taken by Councillor Mike Rendell and his place by Councillor Mike Summers.

Matters arising from the meeting held on September 19 included an update on the Draft Dockyard Development Brief and it was reported that consultation via the media and others would commence at the end of this month (see centre pages). This is likely to include an open evening meeting at the Museum. As to controls on TV and radio aerials and TV satellite dishes, there was no progress upon which comment could be made.

Deferred at earher meetings of the committee were applications by Joan Bound and Kevin Connolly – the former seeking permission in principle for the erection of a dwelling at the rear of 10 Barrack Street was again deferred, but members were advised that some progress had been made following the recent visit of her son, Graham Bound.

In the case of Kevin Connolly and his submission in respect of the continued siting of a container at the rear of Montague House on John Street, the Building Adviser Alan Dawson said he had met the applicant and discussed the use of land at his premises for improved storage etc. This had led to a re-quest for a further 12 months for the container and it was expected that in that period proposals would be forthcoming for development of the property, which would negate the need for the container to be retained. Limited permission was then granted until October 31, 2007

Two applications for the renewal of temporary planning permission were then considered and Robert King was given permanent consent for the two Wyseplan units sited at 22-24 Davis Street and used for storage and a workshop. The Royal Falkland Islands Police had submitted an application in respect of two cabins at their premises on Ross Road which could have received permanent consent at the last "renewal", it was reported, but for the fact that the foundations were not of a permanent nature. As works were planned for the site which would result in removal of both units, it was resolved to grant temporary permission to expire on October 31, 2008.

Only seven new applications for planning permission were listed for review, one of which (a proposed extension to his dwelling at 33 Ross

Preparations continue for policemen's epic walk

AS WE near the end of another month, the Royal Falkland Islands Police 'West to East' charity walk draws closer.

Leading Police Constable Gary 'Guido' Webb and Reserve Police Constable Steve Dent are walking roughly 230 miles, from Port Howard to Albemarle, then North Arm to Stanley via the North Camp roads.

The 'walk' is taking place between December 4 and 14. Guido and Steve are training hard and all Road East for Glen Williams) was withdrawn as it was found to be within the limits of "permitted development".

A proposal for the erection of a 73.3 metre-high guyed mast and small equipment hut by Cable and Wireless on land south of the FIDF HQ on Kiel Canal Road, was the subject of an objection by the Director of Civil Aviation and accordingly deferred to allow discussions.

Darren and Anna Shepherd submitted an outline application for a dwelling to be built on land west of 41 Ross Road West (south-west of the Beaver Hangar) and Director of Public Works Manfred Keenleyside drew members' attention to difficulties that would be experienced with disposal of foul wa-ter drainage. Two earlier submissions had been refused consent for due to the need to have an overall development scheme but, as Alan Dawson pointed out, the current proposal left over 30 metres to the east which would allow access to land at the rear. It was agreed that permission in principle would be granted and that the technical problems envisaged with drainage be left to be resolved at detailed planning stage when a Building Permit would also be sought.

Conditional planning permission was granted for the following: temporary siting of a mobile tearooms coach for Paz Blyth at Gypsy Cove; an outline application for the erection of a one-and-ahalf-storey dwelling with garage and off-street parking at 9A Philomel Street for Jeff Halliday and Julie Belhouse; and the creation of a hard-standing for Paul Ellis at 36 Boxer Bridge Road. The final new application to be

reviewed, for a hatchery and tank farm with associated buildings at 8 Coastel Road for CFL Fortuna Fish Farming, raised a lot of discussion after the Chief Fire Officer (Gardner Fiddes) explained his concerns on the risks associated with the adjacent storage and filling of LPG gas cylinders. Mr Keenleyside suggested that a bund be built on the western boundary to help mitigate those risks, and it was decided to grant conditional planning permission with advice provided on the bund and the risks associated with the LPG as viewed by the Chief Fire Officer.

Just four applications for a Building Permit were then commented upon, to be followed by the report that no applications for offstreet parking grants had been received in the past month.

General Practice... Locum Biomedical Scientist, Neil Smith Blood testing for potential problems in pregnancy

DURING any pregnancy it is very important for the doctor and midwife to keep a close eye on the health of the mother and of the developing baby

Twice during the pregnancy a series of blood tests are preformed on the mother. These "booking" bloods are normally taken at around 20 weeks and 30 weeks into the

pregnancy. The major purpose of these tests is to test the mother's blood for any potential problems that could possibly harm the development of the baby.

Prior to the 1970s there was a small, but significant proportion of woman who after having their first child would have great difficulty in having any more children, despite becoming pregnant many times. It was found that this was due to a reaction these women had in response to having their first child. This reaction was due to an incompatibility between the blood of the baby and of the mother.

The ABO blood group is only one of many blood groups, it is a very important group, but it is the not the most important when dis-cussing pregnancies. There is another very important blood group called the Rhesus group, or more correctly the Rh group. The Rh group is further subdivided, but the critical one in pregnancy is called RhD. A person will be either RhD positive or RhD negative. When somebody says their blood group is "O Negative", what they actually mean is that their ABO group is "O" and their RhD group is "Negative". About 15% of people will be RhD negative.

When scientists looked at the blood groups of these mums who were having great difficulties in hav-ing a second or subsequent child it was discovered that all the mums were RhD negative and they all had a baby who was RhD positive.

A theory was developed that a small amount of blood from the RhD baby was passing into the mother. The mother's body would recognise these baby blood cells as "foreign" and would develop anti-D antibodies that would destroy any of the RhD positive blood cells that were present. Antibodies are a part of the normal reaction to anything the body sees as foreign to it. The antibody produced is very specific to the object seen as being foreign and is usually very effective at causing its elimination. As far as the immune system is concerned a developing baby is foreign to it. The placenta acts as a barrier between the mother and baby allowing the passage of nutrients and waste products between mother and baby, while keeping them totally separate.

Normally during pregnancy the placenta acts as a very good barrier between the mother and baby and their blood would never mix, however there are certain occasions where a small tear or rupture in the placenta can cause the blood to mix.

The fact that the mum may produce anti-D antibodies is not normally a serious problem during the first pregnancy. However the body's immune system has a very good memory and if it develops an antibody once and meets the same problem again it will produce a lot more antibody the second time around. The mum can carry around this anti-D in her blood without her ever realising it is there. It is only a problem if she needs a blood transfusion or has another baby.

If a RhD negative mum has a RhD positive baby first time, she may produce a little bit of anti-D which normally has little effect on the first baby. However if she has another RhD positive baby in a future pregnancy she will produce anti-D a lot faster and in greater amounts, this anti-D can cross the placenta into the baby and cause a lot of damage to the baby's blood supply. The anti-D will specifically attack the RhD positive red cells of the baby and destroy them. In the worst cases the all of the baby's blood is broken down and is unable to develop properly within the womb or may lead to brain damage of the baby.

To counteract this problem most countries around the world test all pregnant mums at least once during pregnancy, normally twice. Not every mum who is RhD negative will produce anti-D antibody, and even those who do will produce it in different amounts. However it is impossible to predict who will or who will not pro-duce the antibody. So instead a prophylactic treatment is given, which is a form of preventative treatment. Instead of waiting to see which RhD negative mums will produce anti-D and those who do not, it was decided to give all RhD negative mums this same treatment in the form of an injection.

The injection is actually a highly purified, concentrated form of the anti-D that causes all the problems. By giving the mum the injection it stops her producing her own anti-D. This injected anti-D can not pass through the placenta and can not harm the baby at all, unlike the maternal anti-D produced by the mum. The injections are given to cover the mom all the way through the pregnancy, and some mums are even given

another injection just after delivery to be absolutely sure that the mum will not produce any anti-bodies herself. Unlike maternal antibodies these injected antibodies will slowly diminish and disappear totally after the pregnancy. In medicine it is quite unusual

for a patient to be given a treatment that they may not actually need, but in this case it is much more preferable to give every RhD negative mum a totally harmless injection instead of waiting to see which ones might go on to produce their own anti-D.

Mums who are RhD positive can not produce anti-D themselves so do not need the injection.

The death rate due to this anti-D production has dropped from 1.2 per 1,000 births to only 0.02 in 1,000 births in the space of only 30 years all because of one simple injection.

There are other blood group antibodies which also cause prob-lems during pregnancy. These problems are very rare, but can be traumatic and very worrying for the affected women. The booking bloods taken during pregnancy are sent to the blood transfusions lab at KEMH and tested for a range of antibodies to minimise the risk of a problem developing during pregnancy. This is one of the reasons that booking bloods are so important; it gives the doctors and biomedical scientists in the lab a chance to detect any potential problems at an early stage during the pregnancy so treatment can be given both to the mum and baby so they remain healthy through out the pregnancy.





Wool report - week ending October 20 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices surged for fleece wool lots finer than 25 micron, but gen-erally remained "steady" for broader lots at sales in South Africa, New Zealand and Australia last week.

As shown in the attached "Mi-cron Price Guide" prices increased by between 5 and 12 pence per kilo-gram clean for lots finer than 25 microns.

Over the last two weeks gains of 15 to 20 pence per kilogram clean have been recorded for good quality fleece wool of between 21 and 24 micron.

Price gains in the mid-micron range have been attributed to a supply shortage in Australia combined with quite extreme short term processing demand. The drop in wool supply (cur-

rent as well as anticipated over the next 12 months) has been driven by an extended period of drought through out much of the Australian sheep belt

Low vegetable matter skirting types with better style and length remained in demand during the week. Such types finished the weeks trading described as "firm" in price.

In an important prediction for the coming wool selling season, Mr. Chris Wilcox, chief economist for Woolmark Market Intelligence has forecast a 5-10% rise in wool price for mid-micron wool (21to 24 mieron) over the next 3 to 6 months. According to the Wool Record Weekly, the price prediction is based on the interaction of falling production (about 9%) and strong demand for this type of wool The AWEX "Eastern Market In-

dicator" (EMI) finished the week

up 7 pence per kilogram at 305.7 p/kg clean compared to last weeks closing level of 298 8 pence/kg clean.

In South Africa 97% of the 4.219 bales on offer were sold. The main buyers during the sale were Modiano with 2.069 bales and Chargeurs with 636 bales. In Australia 93% of the 58,929 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 5,532 bales of crossbred wool of which 89% was sold. In New Zealand 88% of the 13,800 bale offering was cleared.

Sales continue next week in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia with a combined offering of almost 82,000 bales.



Conservative and Labour MPs to visit

AS announced in *Penguin News* last week, two United Kingdom Members of Parliament are due to visit the Falklands next month.

Conservative MP Mike Penning and Labour MP Sarah McCarthy-Fry are due to arrive on November 3, accompanied by the Falkland Islands Government's (FIG) Representative in the UK, Sukey Cameron.

Since 1988 FIG has aimed to sponsor one Parliamentary visit a year, and while it has been two years since the last FIG visit, there have been two visits by Parliamentarians during that time, organised by the Armed Forces Parliamentary Scheme.

In general, Parliamentary visits are getting more difficult to organise, Ms Cameron said, due to the reduction in Labour's majority and the reluctance for the Whips, who give permission for MPs/Lords to be absent from the House, to agree to let them go, especially when legislation is going through the House, "This was, unfortunately, why the trip planned for February last was cancelled at relatively short notice" she said

tice," she said. The other problem, she added, is that to visit the Islands, they have to be absent from the House for a week. "However, having said that, we are never short of MPs who are interested and keen to visit but the problems arise as the date of the visit gets nearer and constituency or Parliamentary business has to take precedence. "All three MPs who were sched-

"All three MPs who were scheduled to come in February hoped to come on this forthcoming visit but for very valid reasons, have had to drop out; as the date gets closer it is more difficult then to find replacements who can clear their diaries in order to visit. We are, of course, very grateful for the ones that do."

Planning for the visits typically starts some six months before in order to book seats on the airbridge, reserve accommodation and fit in with people's availability in the Islands and. Ms Cameron said, "...unfortunately, one can never tell what political issues may come up in the intervening period.

"We typically plan for four to six MPs across the three main parties however, for reasons I have explained that is sometimes difficult to achieve."

She added, "While date changes, name changes, programme changes and the uncertainty that ensues is frustrating, Parliamentary visits are still a vital part of our Parliamentary contact programme.

"They help maintain the all important knowledge of the Islands in Parliament to ensure that we continue to attract the support that we have built up over many years."


FOLLOWING concerns raised by consortia tendering for the construction of an airport on St Helena, changes have been made which involve more of the design work being carried out in advance.

Parlimentary Under Secretary of State Gareth Thomas said that in response to other concerns it has been agreed that, for the consortium that wins the new competition for the airport, some of the cost of unforeseen changes to the project will be shared. These could include sharp changes in the cost of basic materials, such as cement and fuel, significant currency changes and any unexpected difficulties in excavation for the airport.

Mr Thomas said that because of these changes to make the airport contract more attractive to the construction industry. "...procurement regulations require us to issue a new tender, and we have now placed a new advertisement in the Official Journal of the European Union. "This will allow us to complete short-listing before issuing a new Invitation to Tender around April next year. This will mean an inevitable delay in the process of building the airport, and we now expect to see flights commencing in 2011/12. In the meantime DFID will, of course, continue to support the running of the RMS St Helena."

Meanwhile other work on the air access project continues. "In parallel with work on the airport, we are pressing ahead with finding an airline to provide scheduled flights to St Helena. We have now received expressions of interest from six companies, and will be looking at these with a view to entering into negotiations with one or more of them early in the New Year." said Mr Thomas

Year," said Mr Thomas He added, "I have every confidence that we will be successful in realising this exciting and unique development for the island and for the people of St Helena."



Dockyard views

THE manager of the museum is encouraging as many people as possible to share their views on the dockyard development plan.

Leona Roberts said, judging from the comments she has had over the past week, "there does seem to be a general view that this is a sensible move that will benefit all of Stanley."

She added, "Given the season that we have ahead, it's quite clear that we need to provide more in the way of facilities for cruise ship tourists - even basic amenities such as toilets are going to be in short supply - and the dockyard development can go a long way towards solving some of these issues."

Mrs Roberts said all comments are "very, very welcome" and they do not have to be made in writing. "It's not necessary to write in even a phone call to either myself or the Environmental Planning Department, stating support (or not) will be included in the consultation report.

"We really want to hear from people and it would be terrific if we could go back to the government with a firm backing from the pubtic."

Encouraging wool news

WOOL sales held in Melbourne Australia on October 31 saw prices peaking higher than for some years and offered a ray of hope to Falklands farmers.

Speaking on Falklands Radio on Tuesday, Senior Agricultural Advisor, Neil Judd said the wool market had shown in previous weeks "a lot of enthusiasm" for wool between 20 and 24 micron, but in this week's sales that enthusiasm had extended to broader wool, with 26 micron also being in very strong demand. Asked what the consequences

Asked what the consequences would be for wool producers in the Falkland Islands, Mr Judd said that at the start of another shearing season, Falklands farmers could look forward with a little bit more hope than even six weeks ago that prices were moving "in the right direction." MP

MRSA found in hospital

A SMALL number of patients and staff at the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital have been found to have MRSA, the so-called 'superbug'.

A UK resident was admitted to the hospital last week for an opcration on an abscess. A routine swab was taken and it was discovered that the patient had MRSA.

Following routine procedures, the theatre and ward areas were deep-cleaned and tested: no MRSA was grown. All staff and patients in the ward were also tested. Three staff members were found to have MRSA and are undergoing treatment to eradicate it.

Two patients with chronic problems were also found to have MRSA. Director of Health, Nikki Osborne, said patients with chronic problems are more vulnerable to infection. "One patient had been treated in the UK on several occasions and had been found to be MRSA positive in the past and recurrence is normal.

"The second patient had been tested previously and not found to have MRSA. However, the strain of MRSA that both patients have is different to that grown from the original patient, which suggests that the source of infection is not from the hospital. This is still under investigation."

The hospital deals with patients with MRSA on a fairly regular basis, Ms Osborne said, and cleaning and testing procedures following known MRSA admissions have been shown to be very effective.

"All hospital staff are routinely tested for MRSA on appointment, and all patients who return from the UK and are admitted directly to hospital here are also routinely tested."

The hospital is now reviewing its procedures to see if it can tighten them up still further, Ms Osborne reported. "By coincidence, our microbiological adviser, Matthew Dryden is due to visit later this month.

"Part of the purpose of his visit is to review our infection control procedures. Our approach to MRSA will form part of that review." Visitors this

Census cost raises eyebrows

A REQUEST for extra money to pay for the census carried out last month has raised questions among councillors.

At a meeting of Standing Finance Committee held late last week, councillors questioned wastage of resources in the way the census was distributed.

Financial Secretary Derek Howatt confirmed the cost of the census had been considerably higher than last time: the committee were asked to approve an extra £8,000 - on top of the £12,000 already budgeted - to pay for the exercise. Councillor Mike Summers later

Councillor Mike Summers later commented on the situation. "I think there is some collective unease about the overall management of the census exercise and the cost effectiveness of it."

He said there was no indication that the census had not been completed well and effectively. However he added, "There were a number of questions raised about how that was done." He added, "To be fair, the Reg-

He added, "To be fair, the Registrar General hasn't yet been asked to comment, or if he has, we haven't seen his comments. He may feel he has some legitimate explanations... "

The information collected in the census is the property of the Falkland Islands Government; it is all strictly confidential and is only released in composite form, Councillor Summers said.

"What tends to happen is that we release some early information very quickly about population statistics and those sorts of things that people tend to be interested in, and the rest of the report will probably take a couple of months to collate and pull all the information out."

The census report is a public document: in previous censuses, the individual forms have all been destroyed once the information was recorded. However, this year Executive Council agreed, following a request from the Archivist, that the individual forms can be retained in a sealed box in the Archives, not to be released for 100 years. "The Archivist believes there

"The Archivist believes there is some historical data in there that can be of interest in due course," Councillor Summers said.

New aviation requirements produced

THE Civil Aviation Department, in conjunction with Air Safety Support International, has announced a new single set of civil aviation requirements.

A series of seminars to brief industry on the changes has also been arranged.

The new operating rules, known as Overseas Territories Aviation Requirements (OTARS), describe the standards that civil aviation must meet and will cover aviation in the Falkland Islands and the other UK Overseas Territories (OTs).


Andrew Newman, Director of Civil Aviation, explained: "We will now have in place a single coherent code which has been specifically developed to cater for the aviation industry in the Falklands.

"The new requirements will have a significant effect on those who manufacture, operate or maintain aircraft registered in the Islands, on airports and air traffic services and on those who hold personnel licences or validations issued by the Falkland Islands CAD."

In order to ensure that the industry is aware of these changes a series of free presentations has been arranged in all the Territories as well as other key locations.

The seminar in Stanley on November 21 will begin with a special session for the Governor's office and government staff. This will be followed by presentations and discussion for the aviation industry from 1130 – 1630 which will include lunch. A full agenda for each event is available on the ASSI website.

Alex said the standard of entries was much higher than he had expected. "The use of Falklands produce was exceptional and I was impressed by the different cooking techniques used, from baking, to hot smoking and wok cooking.

Councillor's thoughts on education debate

By Clir Richard Stevens IT HAS been interesting to read the ongoing debate about the restructuring of the education department in the *Penguin News*.

John Fowler's editorial at the beginning of the consultation process seemed to be positive, if somewhat concerned about the number of Head Teachers.

Last month's article with parents contributions was just what we want and shows serious public scrutiny.

1 would like to reassure Clare Cockwell, teachers and parents in camp that we are not talking about losing the essential parts of Camp Education like teachers on the ground, radio lessons or the professional support at the end of a telephone line, be it material or moral.

The Camp Education Board of Mangers have had two sessions pre and post the new proposals and our findings will be part of the consultation process.

Carol Peck's concerns about GCSE's are probably shared by other parents, but the point that Barbara Booth made, that all children do not learn in the same way, is very valid here.

There is no reason why students can't achieve equally well through this practical route (NVQs) up to the highest level. It is argued that skills like Maths and English would improve using them practically rather than in a purely academic environment.

The view that the system is too top heavy has been suggested but many of these senior teachers will have classroom responsibilities as well. Part of the idea is to build a pathway of responsibility and experience for ambitious teachers to become a future director. It has to be a desirable goal to see local head teachers and a local director come through our schools in a structured

Rob Goodwin's letter showed a wealth of experience from his point of view, but his assumption that this change of structure is for economic reasons is incorrect. When cost is an issue we say so.

His assertion about highs and lows fail to stand up to scrutiny. Populations do change but twenty years ago there were nearly as many children in Goose Green as there are being taught in all of camp today. Sad but true. I believe we continue to have

I believe we continue to have scholars, some years are better than others, and it is true that many people in the past, with what can only be classed as basic education, have done very well in all walks of life.

In the days of Darwin School however it could be argued that it was only the privileged that had the opportunity to further and higher education unless they won a scholarship.

In recent years we have seen people coming back as doctors, lawyers, teachers etc, but there is always demand for more and there is always room for improvement and that is what we should continually strive for.

In Jenny Cockwell's most recent editorial, she criticised the procedure in delivering this initiative. However change is delivered, there will be faults found. Look at the other areas of Falkland life where change has been suggested – finer wool sheep in farming, East/West Ferry, seat belts, smoking in public places etc.

She says that there were no parents at the meeting who wanted change – we also had a public meeting to discuss banning smoking in public places and there wasn't any smoker there when we asked for a show of hands, to argue a smokers view.

Outside a public meeting there are people who feel we can do better -1 fielded many questioning parents after the last GCSE results. Equally many smokers have made it their business to discuss the merits of smoking.

Jenny suggests that communication is the answer and that all it takes is the opportunity for all parties to sit down and discuss working together. I believe that you need structure for this to work. There are teachers already working together between the schools, but we need to formalise and expand these initiatives so that it is expected procedures that span changes in personnel, personalities and time.

I would like to finish by saying that the suggested restructuring is not a slight on any member of staff, but it is a process in continuing to develop and improve education in the Falklands.

Students check out military career options | Community service for 'wrong house ' row



THE adventures of the LEAP programme students from the Community School continued this week when nine of them toured Mount Pleasant on a military careers visit.

The day included visits to a number of units on the base and gave an insight into the diverse selection of careers available in the forces. They looked at the day to day experiences of firefighters, physical training instructors, aircraft technicians, drivers and air traffic controllers. A visit to BFBS also gave the students a chance to see some of the civilian options available to them when they finish their education.

Sgt Colin Jackson, the organiser of the day, said, "The idea of the day was to promote careers awareness across the three services and to demonstrate the wide variety of professions available in the military

"As well as promoting military careers, we also aimed to show options that have relevance for those with interests in the civilian sector. We hope to continue these activities in the future and we will be visiting years 10 and 11 next week to talk about careers in the Armed Forces with the RAF Careers Information Service.

A number of military careers awareness activities are taking place in Stanley and Mount Pleasant schools and clubs next week, including coaching activities with members of Carlisle United.

A MAN who drunkenly tried to get into the wrong house, mistakenly thinking it was his mother's home, has been given a community service order.

David John Hills admitted threatening Mrs Dorothy Goss and smashing a pane of glass in her home when he thought he was being stopped from entering what he wrongly believed to be his mother's house.

The court heard that in the early hours of October 10 Mrs Goss was woken by banging and shouting at her front door. She went to investigate and heard Mr Hills banging on the door and shouting "let me in". She told him to go away and told him he did not live there. She then telephoned the police.

Mr Mills, becoming increasingly agitated, went to the back of the house and began to kick the back door. Mrs Goss and her partner, Mr Ramsey Shepherd, heard breaking glass and so headed to the kitchen, which is adjacent to the back porch.

Mr Hills opened the door and Mrs Goss held her walking stick up defensively in the hope he would go away, and continued to tell him to leave. However he grabbed the walking stick and did not leave until he saw Mr Shepherd.

He then immediately apologised and started to pick up the smashed glass. Again, Mrs Goss told him to leave and this time he did.

In police interview, Mr Hills could not remember much about the evening; he remembered being told, once in Mrs Goss's house, that he was in the wrong house. His mother lives two doors down from Mrs Goss.

In court on Wednesday he said his actions had been "totally out of character" and he had already spoken to Mrs Goss and Mr Shepherd to apologise. He had also been in contact with the government to discuss reparation for the broken window.

The Senior Magistrate said she viewed the two offences as a very serious incident and she had considered whether a custodial penalty was appropriate. She told Mr Hills, "When it involves causing fear to someone in their own home, it is very serious indeed.

However, given Mr Hills' previous good character and guilty plea and the fact he had taken responsibility for his actions, she issued him with a forty hour community service order instead.

She told him, "I am not impressed by your behaviour at all" and said she "thoroughly disapproved" of his actions towards Mrs Goss.

Mr Hills was also ordered to pay £70 prosecution costs.

It had been intended to present the Companies (Amendment) Bill 2006 to the Legislative Council on 16 November but this has now been postponed to a Legislative Council meeting on 15th December to enable the Bill and the provisions of the Companies Act 1985 which it proposes should be adopted to be published some weeks before it is considered by the Legislative Council so that people are made aware of the new provisions and have sufficient time to consider them, and comment on the Bill, before it is considered by the Legislative Council. The Companies (Amendment) Bill 2006 is the first major review of the Company law of the Falkland Islands since the Companies Act 1948 was

adopted in 1950. The Bill will if enacted modernise the Company law of the Falkland Islands in a number of important respects. It will enable small companies to dispense, if they wish, with the need to have their accounts audited (but require all companies to file their accounts at the Companies Registry). Many companies will, if they wish, be able to file an abbreviated form of accounts. Companies will also if they wish be able to prepare their accounts in accordance with International Accounting Standards (which is not possible under the present law). Provisions are contained in the Bill enabling companies, subject to conditions, to purchase their own shares and enabling private companies to dispense with annual general meetings. Legislative Council will sit on December 15th at 9.00 am in the Count and Council Chamber. Normal business, e.g Questions, Motions and Bills

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News from Executive Council His Excellency the Governor reports on the October meeting

Emergency dental charges waived - for now ITQ/PQ methodology approved

CHARGES for emergency dental treatment are to be waived for those people who have been unable to get a checkup

Executive Council discussed the problems relating to the Dental Department and acknowledged public concern about the long waiting times for treatment, which are being addressed.

His Excellency the Governor reported, "Council decided - on a temporary basis until waiting times are back to more reasonable levels - to waive the charge for emergency treatment for those who have not been able to be seen for a check-up within the previous two years.

Other charges will, however, continue in place and dentists will decline to provide expensive, re-source-intensive treatment, "...if they consider it clinically inappropriate," Mr Huckle said. Smoking group

A working group is to be to set up to advise on whether or not legislation should be enacted to prohibit smoking in public places. This follows the debate held in

Legislative Council last month.

The working party will consist of two councillors, the Attorney General and Chief Medical Officer (or their representatives), and representatives of licensed landlords and the Chamber of Commerce.

Glass and compost recycling gets the go ahead

THE Public Works Department is to further explore options for recycling

Following a presentation to the PWD Committee last month by Maintenance Manager, George Burroughs, the information from which was sent on to Executive Council, councillors decided to take some steps to enhance domestic waste management procedures. They approved the purchase of four glass recycling units. plus 15 food digester units and 15 food and vegetable waste composting units for trialing.

Mr Huckle explained, "These latter will be issued, initially free of charge, to individuals prepared to try them out, with the option to buy them at 50% of cost after one year.

'This should allow the Public Works Department to assess their effectiveness and to decide whether or not to encourage their wider use in the future.

Executive Council also approved a draft Bill for publication, which will apply various provisions of the English 1985 Companies Act to the Falkland Islands.

Mr Huckle explained that this will bring company law into line with equivalent legislation in Europe. "One of the results of this will be that many Falkland Islands companies will no longer have to have their accounts externally audited, thus saving money, although all active companies will have to file accounts annually with the Registrar of Companies in accordance with UK accounting standards.

He said there has been extensive consultation with local accounting professionals, and ExCo hopes that the Bill will be enacted in time for its provisions to apply from January 1, 2007.

His Excellency the Governor said that, so far, the Committee has focused on key commemorative events and the official guests to be invited, and will now be asked also to prepare wider com-

munity-involved plans.

Tourist Board to relocate next door

FALKLANDS Conservation is to be asked to move from its offices at the Public Jetty, to allow the Falkland Islands Tourist Board to relocate

Because of the growing importance of cruise ship tourism, the Tourist Board needs to take back the offices of Falklands Conservation so that they can manage the

public jetty and visitor complex more effectively.

Falklands Conservation will have six months to find new premises, but the Lands Committee have been asked to consider including Falklands Conservation in the dockyard redevelopment plans.

Weather summary for October 2006

TEMPERATURES, rainfall and sunshine were all average for October while gales and strong winds were slightly above average.

The mean maximum temperature for September was 10.5C, exactly the long term average. The highest temperature recorded was 18.1C on the 26th and the lowest maximum was 4.7C on the 5th

The mean minimum temperature was 3.2C, above the long term average of 2.5C. The lowest mini-mum was -0.1C on the 4th and the highest minimum of 7.9C was recorded on the 26th

Rainfall was only slightly below average month, with a total of 34.1mm against the norm for September of 34.6mm. The wettest day was the 5th with 7.4mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 14 days and

1.0mm or more on 10 days. There were seven days when snow or sleet fell and three days when hail was reported. No thunder was recorded and there were two days with fog.

There was 184.4 hours of sunshine, slightly more than the average of 176.7 hours. The highest daily total was 14.3 hours on the 22nd. There were three days when no sunshine was recorded.

The monthly mean wind speed was 16.2 knots, more than the average of 15.9 knots. The highest hourly mean speed of 41 knots and the highest gust of 57 knots, both occurred on the 27th.

There were 17 days with gusts over 33 knots average for the month. Gales were recorded on seven days, slightly above average for the month.





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Cricketers aim for international status

STANLEY'S cricketers have this week been working with the Americas Regional Development Officer of the International Cricket Council (ICC) in the hope that they will become an affiliate member of the organisation.

Grant Dugmore has spent time checking out the relevant criteria required to become an affiliate member and is hopeful that in June, when the ICC council meets, Falklands' membership will be approved. He has also held coaching sessions with senior and junior players as part of his mandate to see the game improve.

The ICC has five regions in the world: Asia, Europe, Africa, East Asia-Pacific and the Americas, the category the Falkhands fall under. Mr Dugmore said there was some discussion as to what region the Falklands would fall under and it was decided that geographically they should be a part of the Americas region.

The Falkland Islands Cricket Association expressed an interest in becoming a member some time ago and. following an exchange of emails, Mr Dugmore went across to Chile in April when the Falklands Juniors were playing in that country. After some discussion he said it was decided membership was feasible and an inspection visit was arranged.

Mr Dugmore said that the basic criteria has been met; this requires that four clubs or teams play in a league, something the Islands have not had before but is not overwhelmingly out of reach. "..it is only 44 people so will not be too difficult."

One ground is required but does not have to be a specific cricket ground, it can be part of a multi sports ground - the ground at Mount Pleasant is perfect - if a little inconvenient for Stanley players making the journey for each match. However there will be various forms of funding available and Mr Dugmore said there was a possibility that some could be used on establishing a cricket ground in Stanley.

cricket ground in Stanley. As an affiliate member of the ICC the Falklands would be invited to play in biannual competitions which are fairly well funded, said Mr Dugmore, although the member country is expected to alsoput funds forward also. There is a regional structure of divisions so the Falklands could be grouped with Turks and Caicos, Panama or similar countries, which could be "quite a big deal." There is however a lot of common sense involved, the ICC representative explained, and if a country feels that it would be a waste of money to travel to tournaments where they would be out of their league then funds can be used for more useful projects.

There is also a pool of funding for the development of the game that the Falklands team would have access to which includes aid for coaching and umpiring. They would become a part of Americas cricket which has a formal body and every year has a form where all the countries send a representative to discuss what is going on in the region, what they would like to happen, policy and strategic planning: "the Falklands would have a voice in that forum," said Mr Dugmore.


Becoming an affiliate member of the ICC, will force cricket here to be more organised, more formally structured, will help everybody with their game and make them more keen, said Mr Dugmore. He added, "It is good to be part of International cricket, there is a sense of belonging in the world."

Co-operative to company debacle

IT WAS reported last week that the Wool Co-op is now to be set up as a limited company.

This is a notable change of direction, given that limited companies are significantly different to co-operatives.

The Falkland Islands Wool Review and Strategic Plan, allegedly cost £10,000 and justified the employment of the author on £70,000 per annum. The paper claimed to be "derived from careful analysis of the situation in the Falkland Islands."

Careful analysis of the situation was never the general interpretation. On July 28, concerns with the paper were detailed to FIDC and it was recommended that FIDC should not pay for such an inaccurate report. It was demonstrated that the paper was "inaccurately researched, full of serious errors and speculative, written with little care for the facts of the Falklands trading environment". For example: the original 10 year cash flow projection was based on a clip of 1,550,000kg clean which is wrong by over 300,000kg clean.

The paper runs to 55 pages, over half of which discuss the plan for a co-operative. Surely Mr Lambert's statement last week "that the ordinance in the Falklands for limited companies suits the needs better than those for cooperatives", should have been identified in his original paper? The size of the wool clip was inadequately researched and now we learn company structures in the Falkland Islands were similarly un-researched. Who believes there was any careful analysis of the situation in the Falkland Islands? FIDC should demand a refund of their £10,000. **Robert Hall**

From the Pacific to the Caribbean and South Atlantic:

by Jenny Cockwell AFTER almost twenty years' service as Attorney General of the Falkland Islands, David Lang QC retires this week. Although he is one of the

most well known members of the community, he is a bit of an enigma to most. His vast and impressively accessible knowledge of law is indisputable but this impressive mind is contained inside a man who seems to exist almost in another world to most of us.

On occasion when chattting to him, I've felt that while he's visibly in front of me, his mind is busy elsewhere, still working away in Chambers on some complicated piece of legislation. This just all adds to the mystery that is David Lang.

When I caught up with him just a few days before he officially retired. I was surprised to learn that behind this quiet man was an eventful career, one which has taken him around the world and back again.

DAVID LANG'S career first kicked off after he qualified in 1965 at the tender age of 23; he worked as a solicitor in local government for three years before taking up a place as a salaried partner in a Sussex firm. This later led to a partnership with a firm in Henley on Thames, where he remained until the end of 1976. By this time he had met and married Theresa - the couple celebrated their 31st anniversary this year.

He left the Henley on Thames practice after "getting fed up of so many divorces and litigation, and this began a new phase in his life; he relocated half way across the world, to take up the post of Secretary of Justice on the Pacific Island of Nauru, at the age of 35.

By this time. Mr and Mrs Lang had had their first child, daughter Margaret, and Theresa was six months pregnant with baby number two, Bernadette.

As Secretary of Justice. Mr Lang had an wide remit - not only was he Attorney General but also head of the police, customs, fire service and registries.

At the time Nauru - which is just nine square miles in size - had a population of around 10,000 people, many of whom were immigrants living in labour camps. "There were Chinese, Gilberteses, Solomon Islanders and Tuvaluans; the Chinese were from both Taiwan and the People's Republic of China ...

Unsurprisingly, this lead to some violence and the police were fully equipped with riot gear: "Labour camps created their own particular difficulties: you could get racial tensions very easily."

At the time Nauru was making all its money through the sale of premier phosphate and investing the income overseas; the island had the highest per capita income in the world. In addition to leading prosecutions and advising the government, Mr Lang also served as legal advisor to Nauru's airline, which had four jets in its fleet. "...we were negotiating access agreements to all sorts of countries and buying aircraft from Boeing.

"We had so much money we had a corporation lending money to other countries."

With a growing family - son Alex

was born in Naunt in 1979 - the strain of the extensive travel Mr Lang's job involved began to take its toll. "Once a month I went down to our offices in Melbourne. I also had to travel on business everywhere in the Pacific and sometimes out of the Pa-

cific... "In 1981. my last full year in Nauru, from early April to mid August, I was only at home on four nights."

This soon became "wholly tedious" and, exhausted, Mr Lang dewas asked by the British High Commissioner based in Fiji to apply for a job in the Turks and Calcos Islands

His application was successful and he took up his new post in the Turks in June 1982; this marked the beginning of a somewhat exciting - and frightening - time.

His transit through Miami airport was a sign of things to come: The Americans at Customs asked me where I was going and what I was going to do. I told them I was going to Turks and Caicos to be Attorney General. They asked me if I had a gun and I said, of course, I didn't. They said, 'If I were you, I'd get one very quickly'

Very soon after he arrived in the Caribbean, Mr Lang learned that Turks and Caicos had a serious drug running problem and this, he said, pervaded his entire time as Attorney General. "The local politicians at the time

were very much involved in running drugs from Colombia to the United States. The Chief Minister owned an aerodrome on one of the islands and he was implicated with the Colombians running cocaine to the US on Lear jets."

Mr Lang was involved in investigations into this and an operation to convict the Chief Minister. He described the time: "It was an absolute nightmare because I couldn't keep anything on paper to track what we were doing in my office.

"It all meant I was working extraordinary hours and it was very dangerous - if I had been found out I think I would have been in some difficulty.

The American Drug Enforcement Agency set up a sting opera-tion to catch the Chief Minister; they arranged to meet him at the Ramada Hotel in Miami, where they planted recording equipment. Mr Lang attended an Executive Council meeting held shortly before the Chief Minister's departure for Miami: "I had to keep an absolutely straight face knowing he was going to be subjected to this sting operation.

"That was the last I saw of him because after they got the recordings at the Miami meeting, they arrested him and a grand jury indicted him. He ended up being sent to a federal prison in Texas for a few years.

Unsurprisingly, this did not make life in the islands easy for Mr Lang: While they didn't know the specifics, the government and members of his party knew I had to have been involved and it got fairly difficult."

But things got even worse in the Turks and Caicos. Not only did the local politicians try to frame the opposition for a fire which they had lit, destroying the electrical depart-ment and philatelic bureau, but Mr Lang and his family also became a target. "They tried to set fire to our

house, but the fellow they used misidentified the house on this small estate and they burnt down the next door neighbour's by mistake.

"This is the sort of thing I was living with ..

The territory was in turmoil full investigation was held on the Turks and Catcos and the Secretary of State for the Foreign and Commonwealth Office set up a commission of inquiry and suspended the ministerial government. A British frigate was even stationed nearby in case troops needed to be landed.

Eventually a constitutional commission brought in a revised version of the constitution. The former Chief Minister was banned from returning to public office for five years after his release from jail and a general election was held.

Mr Lang and his family had left the Turks and Caicos by this time and it was a relief to go. He commented, "I honestly didn't expect to get out of there alive

A new life in the Falklands The Falkland Islands presented a welcome contrast to the Caribbean posting. Arriving in April 1987, the Lang family had by now been completed by the birth of Phillippa.

Mr Lang's first role was in fact not as Attorney General but as Acting Senior Magistrate following the sudden death of the incumbent, Gerry Byrne. He carried out this role for six weeks before stepping into the job of Attorney General.

At that stage his workload was varied. The first Falklands fishing season had run and his team had prosecutions against poachers to con-duct. The law of the Falkland Islands was also in quite a "considerable mess" and something needed to be done about it.

"It was terribly out of date. In the first year of work I produced something like 400 or 500 pages of legislation.

The problem was that the printing office was out of operation because the old equipment had broken down. There was a hell of a back log in printing legislation because, of course, until you could print legislation, you couldn't introduce it

So, looking back on almost twenty years in the Falklands, what have been the biggest challenges faced by the Attorney General?

'Oil exploration legislation" is his immediate response, but not due to any complexities surrounding the issues itself, rather the fact the legislation had to be drafted in secret.

Mr Lang explained, "I had to work on the oil exploration legislation but I wasn't allowed by the Governor, on instruction from the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO), to give any publicity to what I was doing, nor was I allowed to tell councillors the content of the legislation 1 was drafting

This was a difficult thing to do, Mr Lang said. He explained: "I was not, nor have I ever been, the FCO's man but I was under these instructions from the Governor.

Councillors got wind of this and asked Mr Lang to tell them the contents of the legislation. He had to refuse and this did not go down well. "It was terribly embarrassing; it wasn't the instructions I wanted to have. I remonstrated with the Governor who tried to persuade the FCO to allow it to be discussed..

In the end it was discussed and the legislation drawn up, in consul-tation with a number of experts in energy from within the industry, but Mr Lang still clearly feels uncomfortable about this time.

The Seamount Inquiry

Given its vital contribution to the Falkland Islands economic future, it is easy to assume the drafting of fisheries legislation - particularly the recent Fisheries Bill - has presented one of the greatest high lights of Mr Lang's career, however it is the Seamount Inquiry, held in 1988/ 89, on which he places higher historic importance.

Although it lost more than twenty million pounds for the Falkland Islands Government, the dissolution of Stanley Fisheries Ltd, which followed the inquiry was a "seminal" moment for the Islands, Mr Lang said. The Falkland Islands Develop-

ment Corporation had set up Stanley Fisheries Limited which, through subsidiaries, entered into joint ventures with foreign fishing companies. Seamount Ltd, established by two Scottish accountants, applied to buy two old trawlers for use in the Falklands. The bank sought a guarantee of borrowing from FIDC; Mr Lang was sent the guarantee documents and asked to advise on them. pointed out that FIDC was pledging all of its assets to secure the borrowing by one company.

AG retires in the Falklands

"It was a dodgy deal; these trawl-ers were pretty awful and FIDC hadn't told the Governor anything about it. These were the days in which the FIDC board included the Governor and the Chief Executive of the day, yet the Governor was not told about it. Therefore we had a major problem when Seamount became insolvent.

Stewart Boyd QC was commissioned from England to carry out an enquiry into the scandal from which the government lost about £21 mil-"The English QC was very critilion. cal of the way the thing had been done, of FIDC's management and of the whole Stanley Fisheries Ltd empire, " Mr Lang said.

The dissolution of Stanley Fisheries Ltd was a pivotal moment in the history of the Falklands fishery, he said, making room for local people to enter into joint ventures with foreign fishing companies.

"It wasn't the right route, for FIDC to be involved in Stanley Fish-eries Ltd, we needed to promote local partnerships with foreign coun-tries," Mr Lang commented.

Today, while recognising the importance of the new Fisheries policy to the development of Falklands fish-ing companies, Mr Lang believes the "golden era" has passed.

We have passed the peak in the amount of fish that can be taken my own view is that it's due to climatic changes, not over-fishing.

Of the Fisheries Bill he commented, "I hope it's going to mean that government income will increase through taxation and people in the Falkland Islands will see the benefit of it from that point of view.

Controversy

Two controversial issues with which Mr Lang was involved in recent years will remain in the public conscious for some time, the long running arbitration proceedings with Gordon Forbes Construction and the Supreme Court appeal by Mike Bingham in 2003, whose application for Falkland Islands Status was denied by the government.

Of the former, Mr Lang was unwilling to say much as, "the dust has yet to entirely settle." However he did comment, "Arbitrations always result in a settlement somewhere between the two parties. As it happens, I think it would have been difficult for the government in the early days to have settled the matter because Gordon Forbes was claiming so much more than a sum which could have reasonably been settled ...

"It would have meant we were paying at least 50% more than the budgeted cost of the East Stanley Development.

He added, "At the end of the day, even though we ended up shelling out a lot of money, it still seems that the greater number of his claims weren't allowed and I think that the pity was we didn't manage to settle earlier than we did."

Of the Bingham case, which resulted in the Supreme Court Judge declaring the government's decision to refuse Mike Bingham's applica-tion for Status as "unlawful" Mr Lang's language is much more heated.

"It is unfortunate that someone who deliberately tries to blacken the name of the Falkland Islands can't be refused, under Human Rights law - and I accept that they can't - the right to become a Falkland Islander on the grounds that he misleads about the Falkland Islands and makes the Falkland Islands look dreadful.

In his judgment the Supreme Court Justice said the Attorney General had provided wrong advice.

Mr Lang commented, "I accept his Human Rights and I had advised accordingly; but nevertheless, philo-sophically, 1 believe that people have obligations as well as rights - and as a matter of law the Chief Justice decided the case correctly."

He said it came down to a matter of what is "right and just" in a moral sense: "The law doesn't always end up in the result which people think is the right and just moral answer, it's not a perfect instrument.' Faith and law

A devoted Catholic, Mr Lang is a strong member of the congregation at St Mary's Church. So has his faith influenced his work and his interpretation of the law?

The two are very separate, he said, and he has not allowed his faith to interfere with his duties as Attorney General. "The law of the Falkland Islands,

for example, allows abortions: I have not sought to change that law because it is clearly one that is supported by the majority of the people in the Falkland Islands.

"I don't think it is my job, just because I don't like that law, to try to seek to change it.

However, his faith influences him to try to see the law leads to morally just results, "...but not so as to change things which other people agree with.

He added, "I'm not a good Catholic; I go to church every Sun-day but it would be arrogant to say I'm a good Catholic. I should be a better Catholic."

The Civil Partnership Act, which provides recognition of the legal relationship between two people of the same sex, came into force in the United Kingdom late last year.

Mr Lang admitted he does not like this legislation: "Marriage is a very important institution, and the foundation of the state. Civil partnerships detract from the importance of marriage, they are not equivalent to marriage.

He believes there is no desire, at the present time, from councillors for such legislation to be adopted in the Falklands.

However, he added, "As a personal view and without expressing any liking for that legislation, I think it is inevitable that in due course we will have to have legislation recognising civil partnerships entered into elsewhere

'We may get, in due course, to introduce civil partnerships ourselves - that would be a political choice. If the government had decided to introduce civil partnerships, I would not have refused.

Plans for retirement

Mr Lang says he is happy to be retiring in the Falkland Islands. "1 want to keep my brain occupied. I hope people will ask me to do things and to help in the commu-

"People have told me I'll be surprised how full my days will be - I

hope they're right. He added, "I'm happy to be re-tiring in the Falkland Islands, I've always wanted to retire here.

"I can't think of anywhere else in the world I'd like to live.'





General Practice... by dental surgeon Dr Charmaine A Harris Falkland Island dentistry - owning and maintaining your health

IN BRITAIN health and access to healthcare are among the hottest political topics of conversation from the corridors of power to living rooms around the country.

Interestingly 1 have heard similar conversations here in the Falklands – the world is a very small place. However, perhaps entrusting our health solely to politicians and medical professionals omits the people most responsible for their longevity, health and happiness. Each individual member of the population must be held responsible for their own health.

Allow me to draw a parallel. Imagine buying the most beautiful car in the world; beauty, power, class and sophistication on wheels. It's likely that the salesman will talk endlessly about regular servicing, at what mileage certain checks ought to be made, which oil to use (high performance for newer engines), petrol (unleaded), how to maintain the high gloss finish etc.

So, what do you do next? Dive off the forecourt and pull into the nearest petrol station. Do you decide that your new car requires a fuel stronger than unleaded - so you fill her up with diesel? I've heard that diesel lasts longer anyway so you'll get more miles to the gallon. Then later you reason that high performance oil is far too expensive so you pop into your local supermarket and pick up some of their own brand oil. Sunflower. Similar chemical formula, so what's the problem? Now, if you want to be very tight fisted and don't want to put your car through the rigours an automatic carwash of you could use vinegar to maintain the shine on the paint work - it does the job on furniture. After this take endless trips around the country and clock up a few thousand miles and never go for a service.

It's your car so you can do what you want with it, but don't be surprised if late one cold and lonely night your car clunks to an unsurprising halt. Of course, you would never treat a car this way.

To maintain your health, treat your body with care – as you would your car. When it comes to dental health there are only a few casy to follow guidelines that will decrease your chances of having problems.

Why look after your teeth? There are so many reasons, for example: healthy teeth help form a beautiful smile – and we all want that; neglecting your teeth may result in tooth decay, gum disease and eventually tooth loss; gum disease has been linked to heart disease; looking after your children's teeth helps them to understand the importance of health, which will affect so many aspects of their lives. Remember that your mouth is needed to chew, speak, sing, laugh, kiss... why wouldn't you want it to be as healthy as possible? This week we will concentrate

on children's dental health. 0-2 years old

Babies and toddlers need a responsible adult to care for their teeth more than at any other age. Try to help your youngest to achieve their full dental potential by following the points outlined below.

Teething: From about four months of age you'll notice that your baby starts dribbling more than usual and may develop a rash on the buttocks when the teeth are coming through. Babies' teeth start erupting as early as six months of age and can continue for another 18-24 months. Ask your pharmacist for Bongela or another suitable soothing cream that can be applied directly onto the gums to give your baby some relief.

Brushing teeth: As soon as teeth are showing through start brushing (easier said than done) Use a soft toothbrush for children. The head should be as small as possible remember, your baby's mouth is tiny! Use a pea-sized amount of childrens' toothpaste on the brush. It can be easier to carry out brushing if you sit baby on your lap with baby's back leaning against your stomach. With your left hand cup baby's chin encouraging baby to lean backwards onto you. Gently use your thumb and two forefingers of your left hand to push baby's cheeks in - you're trying to keep the mouth open. Fortunately the front teeth are the first ones to erupt so you only have to work at the front of the mouth. Use your right hand to brush the teeth gently. Brush for a good minute and don't give up no matter how much kicking and screaming there is. It will get easier with time - everyone struggles at first

Diet and baby: To drink: only water and milk (mother's milk is always best). Most health visitors recommend full-fat milk during infancy once baby has been weaned – but check with your health visitor if in doubt or if your baby is allergic to dairy – there are other alternatives.

However, don't encourage your baby to go to sleep with a bottle of milk, this can be harmful to teeth. Instead, if a drink is necessary give them water in a bottle. As soon as your baby is able to hold a cup, stop giving them the bottle.

Fruit juices, squashes and fizzy drinks are acidic and often contain a lot of sugar. When consumed regularly these drinks can cause the teeth

to decay. Also, stay away from caffeinated drinks like tea, coffee and Coke.

Your baby has no idea what is for sale in the local shops. Do not fall into the trap of buying "treats" for your baby. Be as health conscious as you can while they don't know what sweet delights are out there. If you want to give your baby something sweet go for fresh fruit like bananas, and dried fruit (unsweetened) like apricots.

Dummies, Dodies, Comforters and Thumb Sucking: No matter what you call it the principle is the same. These devices are great to calm a screaming child and to help them to sleep. However, prolonged use – or prolonged thumb sucking acts like an orthodontic brace and can result in your child's teeth sticking out. Try to wean your child off these by the age of 18-24 months – or better still, don't start on them.

I will gladly receive any dummies brought to me in the hospital. We often accept dummies to "give to other babies who need them more" or we "give them to the tooth fairy" in exchange for stickers, toothbrushes and other goodies your child may enjoy.

Remember 0-2 years:

1. Milk and water only (no acidic fruit juices, fizzy drinks, caffeinated drinks)

2. Start brushing teeth with childrens' toothpaste as soon as the teeth start erupting (around 6 months)

3. Wean off the bottle and onto a cup as soon as possible

4. No sugary foods (chocolate, sweets)

5. Sweet treats like fresh and dried fruit

6. Take baby to your check up appointments as soon as you can 7. Wean off dummies by the age

of two years.

Your toddler and the carly school years. 3-7 years old

The principles are similar to that of a baby, but we have to modify a few points:

Treats are back on the menu! (I hear the whole of Stanley sigh with relief). While I firmly believe that health foods should be a constant, let's teach our children to be responsible around food and not become frightened of everything containing sugar. (Be afraid of E-numbers, but sugar... it's natural). Provide three balanced meals per

Provide three balanced meals per day, (including fresh fruits, fresh or frozen vegetable, calcium (from dairy foods and pulses – like beans and lentils), and proteins from small amounts of meat or vegetarian substitutes and pulses again). It makes sense to have treats (– for fun or good behaviour, but give these as part of a meal – dessert, and not as snacks. Eating sugar between meals leads to decayed teeth. Snack foods could be: fresh and dried fruit, carrot/ cucumber sticks, bread with cheese spread or meat, cheese lumps, nuts etc. To drink – milk and water again, I remain hard line on fizzy drinks – they are very harmful to teeth, even "diet" varieties are harmful.

Toothbrushing

Between 3-7 years of age children can be allowed to experiment at brushing their own teeth, but mum or dad should always finish the job by getting into all the nooks and crannies. Children do not develop the ability to move their wrists and hands as adults do until the age of seven which is why they still need help brushing.

Brush at least morning before school and night before bed. However, encourage your child to get into the habit of brushing their teeth during the day as well, say after lunch. Twice a day is a minimum, not a maximum.

In the Falklands we do not have fluoridated water, so at 2 years of age – or when your child learns to spit out, start mixing a small amount of adult toothpaste in with the children's toothpaste and slowly move over to just using a small pea-sized amount of adult toothpaste. Adult toothpaste contains 3-4 times more fluoride than childrens' toothpastes.

Your child and the dentist

Children attending school will be given dental checkups there once a year. However, when young mums (and dads) come to me for a check up I always encourage them to bring baby for a quick check too. Not only can this reassure the parent that baby's teeth are developing correctly, but it starts a relationship between the baby and the dentist. The earlier this is done the better.

Parents – please... if you hate the dentist (and 1 don't take it personally) please do not tell your children. Put on a brave face for the kids. They often look to mum or dad and copy their reactions and behaviour. If they think that the dentist is a normal place to go then hopefully they won't be put off. We dentists are here to help you improve your health, and we will always be as gently as we can. **Remember 3-7 years:**

1. Balanced diets with healthy foods

2. No sugary snacks, fizzy drinks or caffeine

3. Brush at least twice a day with fluoride toothpaste (adult preferably)

4. Visit the dentist at least once per year

Wool report - week ending October 27 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

FINE and mid-micron wool prices continued their upward surge at sales in South Africa. New Zealand and Australia last week. but broader lots experienced only modest price gains.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" prices increased by between 7 and a staggering 21 pence per kilogram clean for lots finer than 25 microns while broader lots gained between 3 and 6 pence per kilogram clean.

Over the last three weeks gains of between 30 and 45 pence per kilogram clean have been recorded for fleece wool between 21 and 24.5 micron.

Low vegetable matter skirting types with good colour, style and length remained in demand during the week. Such types finished the weeks trading with modest price gains.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up 12 pence per kilogram at 317.9 p/kg clean compared to last weeks closing level of 305.7 pence/ kg clean.

Worsening drought conditions in Australia (acting to reduce supply) and very strong European and Chinese processing demand for wool have combined to create the extremely "bullish" market conditions that exist at the moment.

Acording to Dr Peter Morgan of the Australian Wool Industries Secretariat, supply shortages are expected in Australia as a result of drought through the 2007/08 season. While Mr. Chris Wilcox reports in the Wool Record Weekly of "excellent demand at combing and spinning in Europe and China" with combing machinery utilization in Europe at 99%. He further stated that the "demand fundamentals have been in place for some time so this present take-off doesn't surprise".

In South Africa 98% of the 6,145 bales on offer were sold. In Australia 93% of the 57,553 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 7,219 bales of crossbred wool of which 94% was sold. In New Zealand 83% of the 7,951 bale offering was cleared.

Sales continue next week in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia with a combined offering of almost 80,000 bales.

A trip down memory lan-

Eighteen years ago, November 4, 1988 AN anti-whaling campaign with potential international repercussions grows, resulting in a petition being delivered to the Acting Governor and Chief Executive David Taylor asking that no further fishing licenses are issued to Japanese organisations until that country ceases the slaughter of whales. Mr Taylor says there is no possibility of not giving licences to the Japanese for some time as the government are contractually bound for a further four years.

The season of petitions, Mr Taylor is presented with one protesting against the removal of a television repeater at Sappers Hill. The television service had been made possible by the erection of a repeater by Councillor Charles Keenleyside, however the government ordered its shutdown as the transmission of the programmes to Stanley represented a breach of international copyright

Witte Boyd Holdings Ltd announce that they will set up a fishing company with 50% of its equity available to Islanders - but only if they get licenses from government. The company Seafish (Falklands) Ltd, currently 100% owned by Witte Boyd, has applied for fishing licenses on behalf of a foreign fishing organisation for the 1989 season.

Councillor Tony Blake attends the CPA in Australia and the Commonwealth Small Nations Conference in Tasmania and says he found the people ignorant about the Falklands but searching for knowledge: he hopes he has enhanced their picture of the Islands. While in Tasmania Mr Blake turned his attention to an international incident instigated the previous year when Councillor Lewis Clifton took up the challenge of proving which country has the whitest sand. Conference tables were cleared and carefully transported sand was neatly piled on a glass top table for scrutinising. Tony finally had to manfully own up to the fact that Tasmania's sand was indeed whiter than that of the Falklands.

Councillors and heads of department gather to bid farewell to Rex Browning as he retires from the government after 38 years of service.

The roll-on roll-off ferry Indiana 1 due to operate a link between South America and the Falklands is in Rotterdam after an explosion in the engine room when it set out for the Falklands.

Plans progress to establish a poultry farm in Stanley and 19 year old Sheila Butler returns to the Falklands as a legal secretary after a year's training in Southport where she passed her course with two distinctions.

Police chief found guilty

DAVID MORRIS, former Chief of Police, has been found guilty of perverting the course of justice. Superintendent Morris, who has

Superintendent Morris, who has served in the Royal Falkland Islands Police (RFIP) for two decades, will learn of his sentence next week, at the conclusion of a second trial in which he faces a joint charge with another officer, DS Jonathon Butler.

Mr Morris was accused of pressuring Inspector Len McGill to terminate a police inquiry into an alleged assault by his son, Jason Morris.

Following a four day trial Acting Semor Magistrate, Patrick Curran QC revealed his guilty verdict yesterday afternoon. He said the matter came down

He said the matter came down to Mr McGill and Mr Morris's evidence being in conflict. In the end, he said, he found Mr McGill's evidence as being reliable and Mr Morrts's as not.

He observed that Mr McGill had been uncomfortable and "plainly took no pleasure" in dealing with the evidence.

Mr Curran said he found Mr Morris, "evasive with some matters, misteading in others, and economical with the truth..."

Opening the trial on Monday,

Prosecution Counsel, Peter Cooke, outlined the circumstances which lead to Mr Morris being charged in January of this year.

January of this year. On March 28, 2005 Inspector McGill was made aware of an alleged assault on Patricia Parades Villa Blanco by her partner Jason Morris and sent a female officer (WPC Rowland) to see her, with a translator (Jennifer Sanchez) to assist.

Mr Cooke said the RFIP have an established Domestic Violence Policy (DVP) that Mr McGill intended to follow and, after receiving an update, it was established that Ms Parades was willing to make a statement but did not want it to go to court.

That afternoon, Mr Cooke said, Mr Morris paid Mr McGill a visit in his office and closed the door. Mr Morris was reported to be angry and his manner aggressive and asked Mr McGill, "what the f**k is going on?"

He said Mr McGill started to explain the action being taken however, despite his attempts to reassure Mr Morris, he remained agitated and swore a lot.

Mr Morris asserted that there were two sides to the story, that his son had been assaulted and it was a family matter in which the police did not need to be involved. Mr McGill took this to mean that Mr Morris did not want the police involved and warned of the sensitivity of the matter, Mr Cooke told the court. Mr Morris's anger was unabated and he was scathing and insulting of Detective Sergeant Butler and Sergeant Whistler. The sergeants spoke to Mr McGill, having been alerted by shouting, and he instructed them to continue the investigation.

On the second day of the trial Inspector Len McGill, who has been Acting Chief of Police while the matter has been under investigation, gave evidence.

Mr McGill has worked with Mr Morris in the force for many years and said he had never before known Mr Morris to act as he did on March 28.

He confirmed the prosecution's version of events and said the only time he raised his voice was to defend two of the officers (Butler and Whistler) when Mr Morris referred to them as "those two ba***rds." He said he made it clear that the officers were acting under his direction.

Defence Counsel Paul Treble, in cross examination, established that Mr Morris and Mr McGill had remained friendly after the incident and there had been no complaint made. The incident had only come to light when questions were asked by Metropolitan Officers investigating another matter.

Friday, November 10, 2006

Mr Treble asked if any enquiries had been made about Jason Morris' injuries; Mr McGill said that there had not as the investigation was stopped when it was discovered that Ms Parades did not want to make a statement.

Mr McGill said that he had felt "disappointed and uneasy" about the incident at the time, adding, "...I still do."

Ms Sanchez had translated for Ms Parades when she told Mr Morris what had occurred between her and his son. This week Ms Sanchez told the court the main bruising was on Ms Parades' face, her nose was bleeding and she had bruises on her arms and back.

After visiting the hospital Ms Sanchez said Ms Parades wanted to talk to Mr Morris (Snr) as she felt "comfortable" with Jason's parents. She said that Mr Morris invited

She said that Mr Morris invited her to stay with them so she did not have to go back to Jason's and he asked if she wished to make a complaint.

Trawler *Holberg* wrecked at Port Purvis

THE Director of Fisheries says aerial observation of the stricken vessel *Holberg* shows "only a small amount of oil" in the water around the vessel.

The *Holberg*, a small Uruguayan trawler licensed to fish for scallops, ran aground in Port Purvis, West Falkland on Sunday afternoon.

Representatives for the ship's owners and insurers are expected to arrive this weekend and, Mr Barton said, "...hopefully, a more comprehensive plan can be put in place to deal with potential oil pollution and the vessel itself."

However, things aren't happening fast enough for Grant Munro from Falkland Conservation. He commented, "I've been disappointed by the lack of direct response to the incident and feel the government has a moral obligation to accurately assess the situation through on-site visits..."

He said a team from Falklands Conservation is heading out to the area today to carry out a coastal survey.

In addition to birdlife, organisms on the foreshore are also vulner-

able, Mr Munro said. "Even if it's only a slight sheen it can be enough to kill what's on the foreshore in the short term..."

Bill Pole-Evans of Manybranch Farm visited the site on Wednesday evening. He reported no sign of oiling on the Gentoo colony at Gladstone Valley, however he said there was some evidence of diesel on the beach.

He said there was more oil on the water than at his last visit, on Monday.

IS IT me or has the reaction from the government to the sinking of the Holberg been rather muted?

Once it was established the crew were all uninjured, most people's thoughts moved to the environmental implications for the area, yet no one within the administration has publicly voiced concern about the potential impacts of fuel leaking from the ship, and, to the layperson at least, no preventative steps seem to have been taken.

Had there been more fuel escape the ship (and we are terribly lucky this hasn't been the case) we could have been in for a localised disaster. I worry there still could be a problem, as this episode is by no means over. By the time the insurers and company representatives visit Port Purvis more than a week will have passed; the vessel is sitting there with no one on site, apart from the occasional concerned visitor from Port Howard and observational flights from FIGAS

Or am I overreacting? After speaking to the Environmental Planning Officer, it seems the general opinion within the government is that the risk is low, the place is very sheltered, and not a critical disaster waiting to happen. Dominique argued that there was nothing to be gained from spending an inordinate amount of time worrying about it - "monitor it, wait until the expert comes, then make a decision."

OK, that's me told. However, there still remains an important question - how did such a large ship come to be in such a confined area?

Mr Barton's explanation is fairly straightforward but I'm left wanting more; this incident highlights the need for thorough information to be passed through the relevant channels.

I do wonder whether a specific request to trawl in Port Purvis was made and, if so, why permission was given to do so. If a specific request was not made, then this episode shows the need to have more defined conditions to exploratory licences. It shouldn't be a ticket to access wherever the ship wants, for, as we've seen this week, it can have catastrophic results.

Surely the government has an obligation to ensure ships to whom it grants licences are not entering unsafe territory, areas that in some cases haven't been surveyed in living memory.

Ms Sanchez said that a few days later she was again with Ms Parades when WPC Rowland came to see her. Ms Parades did not want to make a complaint but agreed when the WPC said she could just make a statement. The WPC, Sarah Rowland, confirmed that Ms Parades agreed to make a statement but did not want to take it any further

Another witness in the trial, Sgt Tom Whistler said he was aware of Mr Morris paying a visit to Mr McGill's office because of the shouting that occurred. He and Mr Butler had joined Mr McGill after Mr Morris left the office and he was instructed by Mr McGill to carry on with the investigation

Interviews with Mr Morris conducted by Met Officers Neil John and Carl Bussey were read out in court; Mr Morris reiterated that he had told Ms Parades she was entitled to make a complaint on several occasions and he had been summoned by her as a father figure, not as a police officer.

In the interview he described his son's relationship with Ms Parades as "volatile", adding that they had many fights which resulted in bruising to both. He said this was the worst of their fights and he would have helped her if she wanted to make a complaint. Mr Morris said that if his son's

partner had not called him after their fight he would never have got in-volved "I made a mistake by not backing off... an error of judgement in trying to help her," he said. When asked if he considered his

actions to be transparent and open to scrutiny Mr Morris said they were correct for what Ms Parades wanted, as she did not want the police involved

Mr Morris took the stand on Wednesday morning and told of how Ms Parades, who he has a good rela-tionship with as his prospective daughter-in-law, had called him at home on March 26.

He said she was distressed and had an injury to her nose and bruis-ing under both eyes. She told him she and Jason had had a fight. Mr Morris said he established that she did not want to see the police and as she was tearful and did not want to stay at the Malvina House where her employer had provided a room, he offered her to go home with him where his wife would make up the spare room.

Ms Parades and Ms Sanchez both went to his home. Mr Morris said he and his wife were concerned for Ms Parades and he again asked whether she wished to make a complaint against Jason, adding that if she did he would have to "back off" and call another officer to deal with it

Mr Morris said that on March 28 he received a call at work from his wife who said that Ms Parades was distressed as she had been visited by a WPC and believed she had to make a statement. Mr Morris went to see Ms Parades and again Ms Sanchez was in attendance

Ms Parades was upset, Mr Morris said, and said she had been told she had to make a statement although she did not wish to. Mr Morris assured her that she did not have to make a statement although she could if she wished.

Mr Morris said he returned to the Police Station and paid Mr McGill a visit in his office. He was angry because the WPC had either "knowingly or unknowingly" left Ms Parades thinking she had no choice in the matter

He said Mr McGill was aware of his visits to Ms Parades but felt that he was "too close." Mr Morris said this made him angry as it suggested that Mr McGill did not trust him to do the right thing or give the right advice and that he was deliberately being kept out of the loop

"That was calling my integrity into question and made me very ansaid Mr Morris, adding, "I have gry, a rather loud voice anyway and I did raise my voice and shout." Mr Morris said that he asked if

officers were to be sent to see his son as he too had two black eyes and bruising on his body, adding that there are two sides to a story and he (Mr McGill) only had one.

Mr McGill seemed surprised at this, said Mr Morris, adding that the DVP is there to protect any injured party in a domestic situation.

Mr Morris said he had absolutely no intention of putting on any pressure to end the investigation; he was just angry that Ms Parades had been left distressed by an officer. When asked by defence counsel if he had intended to pervert the course of justice. Mr Morris replied, "absolutely no way - no.

In cross examination Mr Morris agreed that the light between his son and Ms Parades had been of a serious nature adding that the couple's 12 month relationship had been volatile but that this was the first incident of "this nature."

Acting Senior Magistrate Patrick Curran asked if Mr Morris considered this a sound judgement to be exercised as Chief of Police; Mr Morris said he acted as a family fig-ure, adding, "I have constitutional rights to be a father."

When it was put to Mr Morris that he did not want an investigation into the incident involving his son, he said that in hindsight if he had known how his actions were to be interpreted he would have called an officer

Summarising the Defence's case, Counsel Paul Treble said, "...this is the trial of the Chief of Police but also the trial of Dave Morris, fam-ily man," He said Mr Morris was acting in the best interests of a young lady in his care away from her family. Mr Treble said Mr Morris may have shown an alarming lack of judgement as a police officer, "but that lack of judgement was not criminal intent

Mr Treble said the Crown's case hinged on the phrase, "...it's a family matter, the police do not have to be involved." He said the phrase was not an instruction and could be interpreted in different ways. "The inspector did not act on the comment and carried on the investiga-tion as normal," said Mr Treble.

Mr McGill is an experienced officer and did not act on the conver-sation with Mr Morris, nor did he remonstrate with Mr Morris or re-lay any concerns to a higher level, actions that would be expected if the phrase was interpreted as an instruction, Mr Treble submitted.

He said that the Crown asserted that Mr Morris was angry because the "secret was out," however by the Monday (28th) there was no secret as many people were aware of the incident. "It's very difficult to hide anything in a small commu-nity," said Mr Treble.

A call indicating that the Holberg was sinking was picked up by the Fishery Patrol Vessel Dorada early on Sunday evening. The vessel was in Port Purvis exploring for scallops, and grounded on the south shore.

The government's observer on board, Mick Hattersley, told Penguin News that when the vessel grounded in the day, the crew had hoped the rising tide would re-float the vessel. However this did not happen; instead, he said, the vessel "shot to the other side" and they abandoned ship, making it to the shore in life rafts.

All 31 crew were picked up by a military helicopter and transported to MPA. They subsequently arrived in Stanley by road and were accommodated at Lookout Lodge.

The Director of Fisheries said the vessel was operating on an exploratory licence for scallops issued by the Fisheries Department.

"The plan was that they would fish on known scallop beds taking the outstanding balance of the 2006 allowable catch. If they had time at the end of that, the plan was to look elsewhere for other scallop resources,

"In the event the results from the main scallop beds were poor so they requested a change to some exploratory work which was agreed to.

Drastic drop in reindeer numbers

THERE has been a problem with the reindeer at Hill Cove and numbers have plummeted from 32 to 14.

Senior Vet, Vic Epstein, said the reindeer do not appear to be adapting to living in this area on the feed available over winter.

A decision has been made to relocate all the remaining animals to Albemarle. "An area containing a vast mix of vegetation types and diverse topography has been made ready for them and they are to be relocated as soon as possible," Mr. Epstein said.

He confirmed they could not be moved earlier due to weather conditions.

Some of the reindeer are in calf and are due to give birth shortly. It was thought best to move them as soon as possible rather than wait until they fawn, despite the difficulties associated with the transport of pregnant animals," Mr Epstein said.

Veterinarian Joe Hollins has spent more than a week at Hill Cove supervising the capture, movement and welfare of the reindeer

The way they are moved to Albemarle will depend on "what is available and when," Mr Epstein said.

According to Government House, in the light of Detective Chief Superintendent Bussey's report, His Excellency the Governor will consider, "...what action, if any, should be taken."



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

Argentine demands to EU

Mr Taiana said references by all European institutions should recognise they are disputed insular territories and furthermore must be addressed in UN double denomination, i.e. Falklands/Malvinas. MP

THE Falklands should "sing from the rafters" about Argentine pressure, a visiting Member of Parliament has said.

Speaking personally, and not on behalf of his party, Conservative MP Mike Penning said we should follow the example of Gibraltar.

"They launched an expensive high profile media campaign to tell people of the UK, EU and the rest of the world, what a really horrible bunch of people the Spanish were, doing this nasty thing to this tiny little country ...

This campaign, he said, has ended in an agreement with Spain, "...which I don't think anybody would have ever believed could happen. But I am convinced that has all happened because people became aware of what was happening.

The only draw back, he said, is that such a campaign is very expensive, "...they took full page adverts in the British press, they got national petitions going, an astonishing situation.

Now, they are closer to home, there's thirty thousand of them but the principle is exactly the same. Why should you be eco-nomically affected because you are British?"

His colleague, Labour MP Sarah McCarthy-Fry said most people in the UK are unaware of what is happening in the Falklands. "They are aware there is a military presence but I would say 99.9% if the population aren't aware of what's being done economically.

"Awareness raising would do no harm and it's something I'll do when I go back - to raise the profile and emphasise all about the people of the Falklands.

"It's not about a piece of land, it's about the people that live here and the right of the people that live here to self-determination. That's the message we have to get across.

During their week-long stay the two MPs met public and private sector representatives and members of the Armed Forces, and visited a number of places in Camp, including San Carlos and Pebble Island. They were accompanied on their visit by Sukey Cameron, the Government's Representative in the UK.

Both were impressed by the wildlife and scenery on offer and the "warnth and hospitality" of Islanders whom they said had an "entrepreneurial and pioneering spirit.

They visited both of Stanley's schools and later heaped praise on the teenagers they met, who they described as, "fantastically polite and attentive.

Mr Penning commented, "I can't over emphasise how impressed I was by the kids... their politeness and awareness...

'There's a difference between being confident about yourself and your community, and being bolshy ... it was the exact opposite. Of course they'll say 'we'd like more of this and that' - I've got teenage daughters living in London with twelve million people and they say the same thing."

Ms McCarthy-Fry agreed: "The kids had a confidence and self-possession that you don't see in my constituency; there was no shyness, even to a total stranger."

Mr Penning is a former member of the Grenadier Guards and he said the visit had "emotional" moments for him. "I left the brigade just before the Falklands crisis came up and I'm proud of my colleagues in the Welsh Guards and Scots Guards...

"I am ever so proud of what

my country has done for the Falklands..

He confirmed the UK's commitment for the Typhoon to replace the Tornado aircraft which patrol the Falklands skies: "It's a commitment the Argentinians need to listen to ...

He added that the twenty-five year plan for investment at MPA is ongoing: "It's overt so everybody in the world can see that we are determined as a country to make sure we have the support we need.`

The two MPs met with councillors during their stay and said they learned a lot from these discussions.

Mr Penning commented, "Economy-wise, you're not asking for anything from the British taxpayers and I think we've got things that we can learn from how your councillors and community work...'

Particularly, he was struck by the way councillors "take a lot of the controversy away from politics ... " He explained, "You're more open than us, I would be fascinated to see a monthly meeting of my councillors in a hall every month. I doubt there's many elected politicians in the UK who would do it.'


Ms McCarthy-Fry was impressed with the level of councillors' "cross-cutting" between departments: "because you've only got eight and you have to spread the portfolios around, and because it's a small community where everybody knows everybody, there seems to be much more interaction between the departments.

"I'm on the Public Accounts Committee and it's something that I certainly say time and time again, we can't do things in isolation."

Quark's campaign for costs

AFTER more than five years, the legal dispute between Quark Fishing Ltd and the Government of South Georgia continue.

In 2001. Quark had expected its vessel *Jacqueline* to be granted a licence to fish up to 400 tonnes of toothfish (estimated worth $\pounds 2.5$ million).

For the 2001 season, the Commission for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources (CCAMLR) limit had been set at 4.500 tonnes, of which 3.900 tonnes was allocated to longline fishing. The Director of Fisheries of the Government of South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands (SGSSI) proposed that 10 licences should be awarded (nine for 400 tonnes and one for 300 tonnes). The Director of Fisheries also

The Director of Fisheries also proposed to allocate four out of these 10 licences to UK or Overseas Territories-registered vessels and sought Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) views. The FCO advised that a significant UK foreign policy objective was to maintain the smooth operation of the Antarctic Treaty System, of which CCAMLR was an important constituent.

The FCO suggested that the Director should avoid action which might lead to CCAMLR signatories claiming bias towards UK/OT vessels in the allocation of licences. The Director was therefore advised to reduce the allocation of such licences from four to two. When the list of vessels to be

When the list of vessels to be licensed was published in March 2001, the Jacqueline was not included. Quark sought judicial review of that decision.

The Chief Justice of SGSSI found in Quark's favour, on the grounds that the Director of Fisheries had not applied his mind properly to the relevant considerations because he believed - wrongly - that the advice from the FCO had to be followed as if it were a direction. On June 7, 2001, the Secretary

On June 7, 2001, the Secretary of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs instructed the Commissioner, under s.5(1) of the South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands Order 1985, to direct the SGSSI Director of Fisheries to refuse a new licence to the Jacqueline for the 2001 fishing season. The Commissioner and Director of Fisheries acted in accordance with this instruction. Subsequently, this instruction was quashed by a decision of the High Court, affirmed by the Court of Appeal, in judicial review proceedings brought by Quark against the Secretary of State. Quark then claimed damages, in-

Quark then claimed damages, including exemplary damages, against the Secretary of State for breach of statutory duty, breach of common law, and breach of s.6(1) of the Human Rights Act 1998 on the grounds that the instruction violated its rights under article 1 of Protocol 1 to the European Convention on Human Rights. This claim was struck out by the High Court.

Mike Summers of Quark Fishing Ltd explained that there are no specific provisions in Falklands or UK law to enable a complainant to claim compensation from a public body for mal-administration. "...so in our arguments to the Courts we have been effectively asking them to create new law based on the European Convention of Human Rights (depravation of property rights). We have received a great deal of sympathy from successive Courts but no judgement that results in compensation." At issue before the Lords was

At issue before the Lords was whether the European Convention on Human Rights (ECHR) actually applied in South Georgia and whether when the Secretary of State, in providing instructions to the Commissioner, was acting in right of HM's Government of South Georgia or HM's Government of the UK.

This is key, Mr Summers said, "...because if the ECHR does not apply to South Georgia (as the Lords found) we cannot get access to compensation, but if the Secretary of State was acting in right of the UK then the ECHR does apply.

"Unfortunately for us the Lords held that he was acting in right of HM's Government of South Georgia."

Mr Summers said Quark had had no immediate prospect of further appeal, to the ECHR at Strasbourg because it was a UK Constitutional law issue over which they have no jurisdiction, however he added, "...an opportunity has subsequently arisen to have the case heard in Strasbourg in conjunction with other business, so that will now happen -I have no idea when."



Councillors meet with teachers

TWO councillors have met with Education staff to discuss plans for restructuring the department.

Janet Robertson and Richard Stevens reported to the Education Board on Tuesday that teachers feel they have "a lot to offer" in the consultation process about the restructuring.

Councillor Stevens reported. "It has been a difficult couple of weeks: the staff are not against change but they feel they have an important part to play in that change."

Councillor Robertson said the teachers had more problems with the consultation process itself than the actual idea of restructuring. "There is anger and resentment about how the consultation process went...(but) people were prepared to look at the proposals and discuss them."

One main area of contention, she said, appeared to be the proposal for an Executive Head Teacher; "Staff at the Infant and Junior School felt resources on that could be better spent..."

The consultation period was expected to end this month, however the Education Board decided this should be put off.

Director Barbara Booth commented. "With consultation you have to be flexible to what it throws up; it is helpful to have an end point but there are stages at which things can be moved." She added that she is also to meet with Education staff in the very near future.

While in the UK last month, Mrs

Booth visited Falklands college students and took part in discussions on the establishment of an outreach centre of Chichester College in the Islands.

She said the talks, with the Learning and Skills Council in Chichester, resulted in £10,000 being made available to develop the proposal further for capital funding to create a purpose built training facility in the Islands for 14 year old to adult learners, "...which will link to the course provision available at Chichester."

This would include, Mrs Booth said, state of the art technology to allow "on-line and real link learning."


Chichester College were asked to include the proposal in their capital strategy document which is required by the Learning Skills Council, outlining their capital needs over the next few years.

Sea Lion Island's plovers and dotterels under the spotlight

THE Falkland Islands have some of the most exciting environments on this planet where novel behaviours. morphological adaptations and species frequently emerge.

This is the view of Dr Tamas Szekely, a conservation biologist who divides his time between the University of Bath UK. Harvard University in US and a variety of islands across the world. October marked the start of a three-year research project on plovers and dotterels on Sea Lion Island and Pebble Island.

"We can learn a lot about the risks of extinction faced by birds by studying them here in the Falklands" explained Tamas. "Robin Woods and I did some initial research last summer and I discovered that the Falklands is the perfect place to study small wader birds. We'll be comparing the breeding behaviour of birds living on rat-free and ratinhabited islands here in the Falklands and contrast it with that known about populations on continental South America."

Much of the Falklands unique wildlife is found on the smaller islands and this makes them more at risk of extinction. An understanding of their behaviour, genetic diversity and probable naïve interactions with introduced pests such as rats and cats is essential for conservation.

The brunt of the Falklands work will be undertaken by University of Bath PhD student James St Clair. "Over the summer I will be locating and mapping nests, counting and measuring eggs, and banding adults

and fledglings." The handling and banding of birds follows standard scientific methods, which have been endorsed by both the British Trust for Ornithology and the Environmental Committee here in the islands.

The key to the plover and dotterel research is its long-term nature. "We need long-term data to guide our management efforts in the islands," explained Dominique Giudicelli, Environmental Planning Officer. "James, together with Tamas and Robin, will collect data not only about plovers and dotterels but also design easy bird survey methods that can be repeated each year on Sea Lion Island, even after the researchers have gone." This is one reason why the Environmental Committee have allocated funds from the Environment Studies Budget to support the project.

Sea Lion Island is one of the jewels in the Falklands wildlife crown. Sea Lion Lodge now provides accommodation to two long-term research groups, including the Italianbased Elephant Seal Research Group. The lodge also employs a Warden who undertakes a variety of educational, interpretative and surveying activities. Morag Smart, a Scottish Wildlife Interpretation Officer, returned last week for a second summer on Sea Lion Island.

All this research and surveying will feed into a Management Plan for Sea Lion Island, which is currently being drawn up by Sea Lion Lodge, the Falkland Islands Development Corporation and the Environmental Planning Department.

Sheffield findings in public

THE findings of the Board of Inquiry into the loss of HMS Sheffield in 1982 during the Falklands war have been made public, the UK Minister of State for the Armed Forces has announced.

The published documents include the Board's terms of reference, the then Commander in Chief FLEET's advice on the report and the Admiralty Board's response, announced Minister Adam Ingram.

The publication of these papers follows the conclusion of an internal review that was undertaken by his department in response to several requests for information about the ship's loss under the Freedom of Information Act.

"The published documents have been redacted to ensure the Department's compliance with the provisions of the Data Protection Act 1998 (DPA 98). Certain other information has also been withheld as its provision would, or would be likely to prejudice the capability, effectiveness and security of the Armed Forces," added Ingram. It was also anticipated that other

It was also anticipated that other papers relating to the BOI report, including the post-attack narrative and analysis, and the Captain's Report on the incident will be published in two further phases before the end of the year.

However, he added, "...we will be withholding from publication copies of the witness statements that were taken by the Board, as we believe that the disclosure of this personal data would be unfair to the individuals concerned..." MP

Bank gets behind web petition

STANDARD Chartered Bank is getting behind a global virtual petition to get the world's financial institutions, governments, law enforcement authorities, internet service providers and payment associations to work together to stop the exploitation of chilpndren on the internet.

The site carrying the petition, www.lightamillioncandles.com, was developed by volunteers in Singapore, including staff of Standard Chartered Bank, and in fewer than 30 days achieved over half a million pledges of support from people in 149 countries across five continents. The aim had been to light one million candles by the end of the year but this target has already been achieved.

However, the campaign continues and has spread through magazine editorials, email campaigns and a television commercial that has been created that has aired on channels including CNN, BBC World, Discovery Channel and MTV. Nick Hutton of Standard Chartered Bank in the Falklands said the campaign does not call for any money. "Its aim is to raise awareness of a growing problem and to raise its importance with bodies that may be able to do something to stop the flow of money to the sites that post the offensive images. After all, these are not pornographic images in the normal sense since they are offen photo-



He commented. "Next year is a big one for us all but I believe, as do many others, we won't start to see a tail off in visits until at least 30 years have passed.

"As was pointed out at the banquet by Nicci Pugh, presently our returning veterans coming to the Islands costs us in the region of £1,500 per veteran, including all the little things that we manage to do for them

whilst here. Speaking from personnel experience it is the little things that make the whole experience a suc-

"This price would be considerably more if it wasn't for the continuing and considerable hospitality shown by local hosts."

Gary was keen to thank everyone in the Islands who, "...gives their time, hospitality, money, and kindness to the veterans who, in just about every instance that I have been involved with, leave here all the better for their visit to the Islands."

He added, "SAMA Falklands will soon be announcing the forming of a sub-committee to work with the present trustees, with the aim of preparing for next year's many visiting veterans

"We are going to need a very large bed for a vet' appeal, also vehicles as before to help get everyone of the 200 expected returning vets in November to all of the places that are important to them.

Visiting veteran, John Stubbs whose troop was attached to 3 Para in 1982, said he had a "great time" at the banquet. He explained, "We were very overwhelmed by the people who came to thank us for what we did here 24 years ago. In the UK the Falklands war is just a memory."



TriStars fit into next decade

THE Royal Air Force Lockheed TriStars which for many years covered the air bridge to the Falklands will be undergoing flight management and communications systems improvements following the award of a £22 million contract to Marshall of Cambridge Aerospace.

The company will make a number of enhancements to the TriStar, including introducing a new flight management system and improving flight safety, and will make sure the fleet remains an agile and capable platform well into the next decade.

Within the new flight management system. Precision Area Navigation compliance will be provided allowing terminal airspace operations to be based on common regulations and ensuring consistent levels of flight safety.

The new system will also include a fully integrated flight display suite that uses the latest in liquid crystal display technology and analogue-to-digital interfaces to give accurate information via primary flight and navigation displays. Communications will also be improved with the introduction of the Dual Rockwell Collins VHF radio.

The contract will run until December 2009 and will be managed by the Air Refuelling and Communications Integrated Project Team (ARC IPT). *MP*

General Practice by KEMH Pharmacist Martin Fisher Slip, slap, slop: the sun and your health

TOO much sunlight is harmful and can damage the skin. There are two main types of damaging ultraviolet sunlight, UVA and UVB. UVA has an effect of ageing the skin and causing wrinkles and other damage to deeper layers of skin. UVB causes sun tanning but also burning

It can also cause other damage to the skin. In some people, too much UVB may cause skin cancer. All people are at risk if exposed to too much sun. People with fair skin, freckles, red or ginger hair are most at risk. In general, the darker the skin, the less risk of developing skin cancer

Most people are aware of the risk and use sunblock when on holiday. The problem also occurs here in the Falklands where the combination of sun and a cooling breeze mean that it is easy to burn without realising how strong the sunlight is.

Remember, that some sun exposure is beneficial - it causes the skin to make vitamin D, essential for our health. Sun exposure is also important in maintaining a good mood with some people suffering from seasonal affective disorder, a form of depression, when getting too httle sunlight. It is very impor-tant to avoid damage to the skin through excessive exposure.

Preventing sun damage

Stay out of the sun as much as possible. The suns rays are strongest between 10am and 2pm, so if possible avoid exposure during these time

When out, wear wide brimmed hats to protect the face and neck These are the areas most commonly affected by skin cancers due to too much sunlight

Cover up the body as much as possible. Wear long sleeve tops and long trousers or baggy shorts. Some clothing is now marked with a sun protection factor (SPF)

Children's skin is more sensitive than adults. They should keep their clothes on whilst playing in the sun All exposed areas of the body should have sunscreen applied. Wide brimmed hats with a neck protector are recommended.

Sunscreens should be applied to all exposed areas of skin. Renew it regularly. Sunscreens are labeled with a sun protection factor (SPF). A factor of 15 or more is recommended for maximum protection. Most work by absorbing ultraviolet rays but some reflect the rays. Ones that protect against both UVA and UVB are the best. Sunscreens should be used to help protect against sunlight, not as a substitute for avoiding exposure. Apply regularly and be careful to apply to all exposed skin – commonly missed areas include backs of hands, neck and ears. Also, apply to the feet if wearing sandals.

Some sun tanning lotions do not contain sunscreen and will provide no protection. Beware of reflected light. On

sunny days, even in the shade, a hot sun can burn if reflected from sand etc. Sunlight can also come through thin cloud and thin clothes.

The suns rays are more powerful at higher altitudes. Beware of this. It may be cooler but you will need more protection.

Wear sunglasses as exposure to prolonged sunlight can also damage the eyes.

Some medications may make the skin more sensitive to the ef-fects of sun, for example doxycycline or amiodarone. People taking such tablets need to take even more care to avoid excessive exposure to sunlight.

Remember - SLIP, SLAP, SLOP, Slip on some clothes. Slap on a hat. Slop on sunscreen.

Sunblock

Cheap sun creams are usually just as good as expensive ones. They are all tested the same way and it is the level of protection they give you against the sun that matters most. This is the 'sun protection factor' or SPF.

Do check the 'use by' date. Most creams will last about two or three years - so it is OK to use last year's, but not a bottle from five years ago!

Sun creams have changed a lot in the past 15 years. There is a huge range and it can be difficult to know what to buy. You should choose one that says it protects against both UVA and UVB radiation from the sun. This may be

labeled 'broad spectrum'. The SPF tells you the amount of protection the sun cream gives against UVB radiation. We recommend at least factor 15. This is because it gives the best balance between protection and cost. The higher factor creams are more ex-pensive, but do not give much more protection than factor 15. If you use:

Factor 15, only 7% of the harmful UVB rays will get through Factor 30, only 4% of the

harimful UVB rays will get through Factor 60, only 2% of the harmful UVB rays will get through

So you can see, you are getting some more protection with the most expensive creams, but not that much more. There is no sun cream that can give you total protection. 98% protection (with factor 60) is about the best you will get.

UVA protection is shown by nought to five stars. But, this is only a rough guide because it is also affected by the SPF. A cream with SPF 25 and three stars may give more UVA protection overall than a cream with SPF 10 and four stars

Don't assume that because you out without burning. Keep an eye on your skin (and your children's skin) at all times. Children have thinner, more delicate skin than adults and are at higher risk of burning. It is best to use waterproof sun cream because it is less likely to be sweated or washed off.

Putting your cream on

Firstly, you should put your sun cream on before you go in the sun. Then put on another layer to make sure you have not missed any bits. Put it on before moisturiser, make up or insect repellent. It must go on before anything else so it is next to your skin. Sun creams rub off. Even if they

say they are waterproof, they may come off when you are swimming. In order to get the best protection, you must re-apply them often - at least every two hours, and more frequently if it is washed, rubbed or sweated off.

You must apply sun creams thickly. thickly. Nearly everyone puts them on much too thinly and so they don't get as much protection as is specified on the bottle. You should be able to see and spread it very easily. If it all disappears as soon as you start rubbing it on, you have not used enough. About a golf ball sized dollop should do for small children.

Usually, the higher the SPF, the more the product costs. Use factor 15 rather than be put off altogether by the cost of the higher factor creams and lotions.

Sunburn and sunstroke

Short term overexposure to sun can cause burning. The skin becomes red, hot and painful. After a few days the burnt skin may peel. A cool shower or bath will help.

Soothing creams such as calamine lotion will help. Paracetamol will help with pain.

If vomiting, fever and headaches occur this may be due to sunstroke. Make sure you drink plenty of fluids and take some paracetamol. Consult your doctor if it does not quickly settle. Sun damage

Repeated exposure to too much sun over a number of years can cause damage to skin. Apart from early ageing and wrinkling, sun damaged skin can include the following. Brown spots, roughened 'crusty' spots and skin cancers.

It is not just people who sunbathe who are at risk. Outdoor workers who do not cover their skin are more prone to these prob-lems. If you notice any area of skin that looks unusual, or any lumps or moles that change shape, become irregular in shape, bleed, change colour or become ulcerated (sore), then report this to your doctor.

Twenty-four years ago, November 8, 1982 THE general assembly of the United Nations, prompted by Argentina and supported by possibly the most powerful member state, the USA, tell Britain that she should return to negotiations with Argentina about the future of the Falklands.

The Argentine Government (who were surprised to be met several weeks ago by a small group of Islanders who pleaded their case to self determination) were supported by three Islanders and former resident Reynold Reid - two of whom had defected to Argentina during the latter days of the war - who addressed the General Assembly.

Alex Betts and Reynold Reid left the Falklands aboard an Argentine hospital ship only days before the surrender. Mr Reid said that many Islanders would have accepted Argentine sovereignty if their way of life had been guaranteed, adding, "a peaceful solution recognising Argentine sovereignty must be found." Mr Betts told the Assembly, "Now Islanders must accept change and adapt," Two locally born women who had several years ago married Argentine citizens and went to live in Argentina are also taken to the UN to add human aspect to the Argentine argument. A British delegate describes the statements made by Susan Coutts de Marciello and Barbara Minto de Pennisi as "rather home spun" saying they expressed concern for their families in the Islands, that peace must be restored and

the British military presence removed. The MV Norland is to be replaced by the luxury liner Countess which has been serving in the Caribbean.

The Polish fishing fleet that frequented the fishing grounds around the Falklands before the war returns with the mother ship Zulawy and six other trawlers moored in Berkeley Sound. The Navy are reported to be reluctant to allow the fleet to operate out of a now rather congested Port William, and Berkeley Sound is soon to be declared a port for the use of fishing vessels which will enable the government to levy normal harbour dues on ships using it.

An RAF GR3 Harrier aircraft crashes near Stanley Airport during a routine flight. The pilot ejected safely just north of Cape Pembroke and the aircraft dived into the sea. No explosion was heard or seen.

Fourteen years ago, November 13, 1992 DOWN draft from a helicopter is used to help disperse a film of oil that spreads from the damaged military supply ship St Brandan. The ship had touched aground and damaged her bow off Annie Island. Speedwell Island.

A new order is drafted in ExCo to ensure that anyone who enters the Islands illegally can be expelled promptly. The question of illegal immi-gration is sparked off by Korean fishermen who left their ship because of a dispute with their captain.

Argentina threatens the illex fishery by designating quantities of stock as surplus. The Falklands believe that squid is over- exploited with an escapement of less than 40%, the Argentines believe it is under-exploited but have done no research to substantiate this.

The matter of unattended airstrips is discussed at ExCo with the Governor saying it may be hard for people living in isolated areas but there must be strict adherence to the safety rules for aircraft landings. He said if there were a serious accident - such as the one in 1987 at Brookfield - the Civil Aviation Authority in UK would scrutinise FIGAS operations and they could be seriously restricted.

Port Howard Lodge is hopeful it will be back in business by Christmas following a disastrous winter with 20 burst pipes and several ceilings down. Clothing left over from the Cathedral bazaar is shipped to Punta

Arenas aboard Apollo 1 for distribution to Chilean orphanages and those in need.

Wool report - week ending November 3 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

FINE and mid-micron wool prices soared at sales in Australia, South Africa, and New Zealand last week. Broader fleece wool lots also increased significantly.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" prices increased by between 13 and 36 pence per kilogram clean for lots of fibre diameter 18 through to 26 microns. Broader lots gained between 4 and 7 pence per kilogram clean.

Price increases over the last month have taken fine and midmicron prices up by between 50 and 80 pence per kilogram clean.

Fine and mid-micron fleece wool lots are now trading at premiums of 15 to 30% over last years prices while lots broader than 28 micron are trading at levels either on par with last years prices or at slight premiums (up to 5%).

premiums (up to 5%). The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up 25 pence per kilogram at 343.1 p/kg clean compared to last weeks closing level of 317.9 pence/kg clean

Increased fear of falling greasy wool supply in Australia for next year, combined with extreme Chinese and European processing demand are believed responsible for the current extra-ordinary market conditions.

It is obvious that the next few weeks will be important for wool producers everywhere in the world as they attempt to gauge the medium term strength of the market and consequently make decisions about when to sell wool. In South Africa 99% of the

In South Africa 99% of the 6.662 bales on offer were sold. In Australia 94% of the 58,677 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 7,056 bales of crossbred wool of which 94% was sold.

Sales continue next week in New Zealand. South Africa and Australia with a combined offering of almost 70,000 bales. It should be noted that due to a public holiday in Australia on Tuesday, sales will not resume until Wednesday 8th November.

Roy Reynolds took the prize home with a net score of 61 while John Burns had the next best net score of 64.



Military take no prisoners as Moody get the blues

MPA established themselves as early favourites to win the inaugural Falkland Islands Cricket Cup (20-20 competition) with a convincing defeat of Stanley on October 29. Stanley, however, later recorded their first victory of the season against fellow Islanders' side, Moody Brook. The match between MPA and

Stanley was given an explosive start by the military's opening pair of Redfern and Van Zyl. Redfern made a quick-fire 25 before retiring hurt, whilst Van Zyl (28) hit four boundaries, including a six, before holing out to Dawson off the bowling of Marlor.

Reeves (4-0-20-0) was the pick of Stanley's bowlers with good sup-port from Cofre, as the Stanley side struggled to keep MPA's run rate below six an over. An assured unbeaten half-century from Phillips meant that Stanley would have to score 150 to win from their

designated 20 overs. Accurate MPA bowling tied down Summers and Dawson at the start of Stanley's first innings of the day, before the arrival of Reeves heralded an aggressive counterattack. Reeves and Cofre tried to keep the Stanley side up with a soaring required run rate, before both valiantly perished in the at-tempt. Some fine hook and pull shots from Anderson (26 not out) late in the innings gave Stanley

something to smile about, but they eventually fell short by 51 runs, clos-ing on 98 for 6.

In the day's other game, Moody Brook made a very shaky start to their innings against Stanley. Four wickets went down for only seven runs, until a cultured 18 from junior Josh Peck steadied the Moody Brook side. Reeves (30 not out) then provided some much needed acceleration to the Moody Brook effort, ably supported by another two juniors, Hewitt and Clifford. Stanley were finally set 84 to win from their 20 overs

The dismissal of Dawson for 6 early in Stanley's reply gave Moody Brook some hope of defending a total that was probably 25 runs short. However, a partnership of 42 be-tween Marlor and Barrett effectively put the result beyond doubt. After Marlor was smartly caught behind wicket off Peck's bowling for 30, Barrett (22 not out) and Clapp (12

not out) saw Stanley home with 5 overs and 6 wickets to spare. Both games were watched by ICC official, Grant Dugmore, who was impressed by the evident enthusiasm for and standard of cricket in the Falkland Islands. All players would like to thank Cpl Wheeler for his organisation of the day and Neil Smith for umpiring. The next round of games in the Falkland Islands Cricket Cup are scheduled for November.

Baggage restrictions

NEW restrictions on the size and carriage of liquids in hand baggage come into force next week.

From November 23, dimensions of hand luggage must not exceed 56cm x 45cm x 25cm including wheels, handles and side pockets. Other bags, such as hand bags, may be carried within the single item of cabin baggage.

All liquids must be placed in a transparent, resealable plastic bag. Only travel-size toiletries of 100ml capacity or less, in separate containers, are permitted. Liquids that cannot be placed inside the resealable bag must be packed in hold luggage and checked in.

Detective pleads guilty to new charge

IN A dramatic turn of events, suspended police sergeant Jonathan Butler pleaded guilty to a charge of misconduct in a public office on Monday. He is expected to be sentenced today (Friday).

A joint charge of doing acts tending and intended to pervert the course of public justice against Detective Sergeant Butler and his colleague, Superintendent David Morris, was discontinued by the prosecution following a review undertaken by the Attorney General, in the light of Mr Morris' conviction on November 9 for a similar offence.

Mr Morris' counsel, Paul Treble, informed the court on Monday that his client was being treated in hospital; he awaits sentence in respect of last week's trial.

The Acting Senior Magistrate, Gary Hickinbottom, ordered the rapid preparation of a presentence report for Mr Butler, and said he will likely deliver sentence today. He told Mr Butler a term of imprisonment is, "...certainly one of the options I will be considering."

The charge

In court on Monday, prosecution counsel, Peter Cooke, said the charge of misconduct in a public office stemmed from an incident in July 2005. On July 17, police were called to deal with an alleged public order offence in the Globe Tavern, centering on an argument between and a man and woman. PCs Pearce and Collins attended the scene, spoke to the couple individually and calmed the incident down.

Both wrote witness statements about the incident and each dealt with the conduct of an off-duty WPC; they said she had intervened in the incident in an unnecessary and inappropriate manner. Mr Cooke said both officers described her actions in terms consistent with a "minor assault".

The original case against Mr Butler and Mr Morris was that thereafter they brought pressure to bear on the two junior officers to produce different versions of their witness statements, covering up the WPC's actions, which the junior officers did.

The "pseudo original" statements were then submitted to Crown Counsel for considering as to what action might follow.

The charge of misconduct in a public office, Mr Cooke said, is limited to Mr Butler knowingly submitting the revised statements without declaring they were not the originals.

De-mining talks

Friday, November 17, 2006

A FEASIBILITY study on the clearance of land mines in the Falklands is due to begin soon.

Diplomats and experts from the United Kingdom and Argentine Joint Working Party (JWP) attended a meting about the study in Paris earlier this month.

According to a press statement from Government House, the representative of the Argentine government, Minister Guillermo Rossi, signed a contract with Cranfield University, represented by Alastair McAslan, whose offer had been previously selected by the JWP and approved by the British and Argentine governments, to carry out certain tasks of the main study of the feasibility study.

The representative of the British government, Jon Wilks, signed a declaration witnessing that the contract had been entered into.

The tasks requested of Cranfield University by the contract funded by both governments will include a field survey on the Falklands to be carried out in December 2006 and monitored by two experts from each country. Cranfield University will then submit a report to the JWP in February 2007.

According to the statement from Government House, the JWP also agreed to move forward on several tasks during the intersessional period, "...with a view to fulfilling the shared commitment to carry out the Feasibility Study in the light of the obligations of the Ottawa Convention (on anti-personnel mines)."

The next meeting of the JWP will take place in London in February 2007.

FOR those of you who expected this week's comment to be dedicated to Monday's events in court. I must explain I have decided it is appropriate and legally safer - to wait until sentence has been passed.

This is not a matter to be brushed under the carpet and there are a number of outstanding questions which we must consider. Let's just get

today's sentencing over with first. However, it should be pointed out the charge of perverting the course of justice is different from that of misconduct in public office. The former is not necessarily more serious than the latter, unlike assault charges where assault occasioning grievous bodily harm is more serious than as-sault occasioning actual bodily harm.

As someone explained to me, it's a bit like comparing apples and pears

"both grow on trees and are fruit but they don't taste the same".
 It follows that the facts the prosecution puts before the court to prove the misconduct charge may not be the same as those they would have sought to prove at the trial of the perverting justice charge.

THE vox pop carried out by Penguin News to mark the first birthday of this sitting council revealed some unhappiness within the community.

Contentors will be disappointed by a number of the comments - person-ally, I was quite surprised by the depth of dissatisfaction expressed by some -but hopefully this will highlight areas for improvement. To a degree feelings of powerlessness and resentment will always exist within the general public - you can't please all of the people all of the time - but given the emphasis on transparency during the election, a year on people should surely be feeling more 'in the loop' about how decisions are made made.

It's not all negative - Cllrs Clausen and Summers are clearly getting something right - however there seems to be a definite feeling that we're being railroaded into decisions the public does not actually support.

One can't help but wonder whether the results of the vox pop wouldn't have been much more favourable if councillors had left the Holiday Credits Scheme alone.

BY NO means do I subscribe to the 'children must be seen and not heard' adage, but I wasn't the only person embarrassed by the behaviour of a small group of kids at Sunday's remembrance service.

Given the solemn mood of the gathering, and the very nature of the occasion, I couldn't believe their parents allowed them to run around squealing, particularly during the two minute's silence. No one expects children to be soundless statues at these events but it

would be good if their parents could at least keep them still and reasonably quiet during this time that is dedicated to remembering lost loved ones.



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Reaction to Holberg criticised

COUNCILLORS have been grilled about the government's reaction to the grounding of the trawler Holberg in Port Purvis.

At a public meeting held in the Junior School on Tuesday they were asked why no plan was put into action to contain fuel contamination in the area, after the vessel grounded on Sunday, November 5. Cllr Richard Davies told the

meeting that the Holberg had a "relatively small" quantity of leakage and it was deemed not worth taking oil spill kit to the area.

He said he had asked if the government was doing everything it should to avoid a major environmental impact and was assured this was the case.

A member of the public asked why the divers - who are all Stanleybased - had not been sent out sooner. Cllr Clausen responded that it had been deemed wise to wait until expertise arrived from abroad on Saturday

When asked if the captain and owners of the Holberg would face prosecution, Cllr Summers said he had submitted a written question regarding the incident and was expecting a response "relatively shortly" Director's update

At a meeting of the Environmental Committee held yesterday afternoon, the Director of Fisheries gave an progress update on the evaluation of the Holberg's situation. John Barton said Steve Waugh (Fishery Officer) and Sarah Crofts (Falklands Conservation) had visited the shoreline close to the Holberg on Friday, November 10. Mr Barton told Penguin News,

"The report produced by Steve Waugh confirms that oil pollution is affecting an area close to the vessel, but is limited in its impact at present. The quantity of oil leaking from the vessel seemed low during the visit, and this largely confirms the results obtained from aerial surveillance.

"The impact on the shoreline and environment generally was as-sessed as low at the time of the visit. As far as can be determined it does appear to be mainly marine gas oil which is leaking from the vessel and this is likely to undergo significant evaporation which will have been assisted by recent weather conditions."

A team representing the owners of the vessel, Fripur, including their surveyor travelled to Port Howard on Tuesday. Divers from Stanley were flown to Port Howard on Wednesday.

Mr Barton commented, "The best course of action is to try and plug the sources of current leaks and to allow the marine gas oil to weather and evaporate. It should do this quickly, particularly so in view of the high wind speeds expe-

menced since the grounding." Mr Barton said oil spill response equipment could be deployed and used. However, he added, "it is unikely to be very effective at deal-ing with marine gas oil. "Additionally, there would be

significant logistical issues with dealing with the likely volumes of oil and water mixture which might be collected. Dispersants would not normally be used inshore. As indicated, the quantities of marine gas oil observed so far should evaporate relatively quickly."

Mr Barton said he understood that senior representatives from Fripur may arrive in the Falklands later this week.

Communications are ongoing with Fripur with a view to securing the removal of the oil and vessel."

Brigadier is new boss of BFSAI



COMMAND of British Forces in the South Atlantic passed from the Royal Navy to the Army as the outgoing Commander, Commodore lan Moncrieff, formally handed over to Brigadier Nick Davies on Monday.

Brigadier Davies MBE MC has served with the Royal Signals and the Parachute Regiment in Germany, Belize, Northern Ireland and Iraq during the First Gulf War, where he was awarded the Military Cross

He later went on to command 1 Para and completed tours as a Colonel in Northern Ireland and Afghanistan.

Brigadier Davies said he was "very pleased" to be in the Falklands Islands and to take command of British Forces.

"Our mission of ensuring security of the Islands presents unique opportunities and challenges, and I am looking forward to working closely with the Falkland Islands Government and getting to know the Islands and people well.'

He is married with two young children and is posted to the Falklands for 18 months.

'Damn right it was worth it' 25th anniversary commemorations



AROUND eighty people were kept enthralled by a talk given by the three visiting Royal Marine veterans on Wednesday evening.

Col Paul Denning and Lt Col John Davies, who are still serving in the armed forces, and Andy Shaw were the three troop commanders in Yankee Company, 45 Commando 1982 ID.

In the FIDF Club on Wednesday evening, the men had the audience both laughing and reflecting with their tales from the war

First to speak was John, who told of three men's careers prior to 1982 and the build up to the war. Describing the preparations and journey south, he said the arrival at San Carlos on May 21 was actually a relief. "we were finally getting a chance to go about our business..." Paul then took the audience

through the yomp from Port San Carlos to Bluff Cove Peak, a distance of around 75 miles. He said morale at this incredibly challenging time was boosted by the fact the British forces were defending their own territory. "We were fighting for a just cause."

Andy took up the story, and decribed the assault on Two Sisters which involved an advance over 2,000 metres of open ground under bright moonlight; John and Paul were both injured at this point

The attack took about twelve hours, Andy said, and ended at dawn. They remained on Two Sisters for around 30 hours before being instructed to prepare to attack Sap-per Hill. This never happened, however, as news of the surrender came soon afterwards.

John then spoke again, to describe their return journey to the Falklands. The three yomped in to Stanley from Port San Carlos last week, retracing their steps. He and Paul had "unfinished business" to deal with, as they did not make it to Stanley in 1982.

The most important aspect of this return trip, he said, was to meet the people who live in the Falklands. He concluded, "Was it worth it? Damn right it was

THE 25th anniversary of the Falklands War will be commemorated across 8,000 miles and four time zones, in London. Pangbourne and the Faikland Islands from June 14 to 17, 2007, Veterans' Minister Derek Twigg announced this week.

Speaking at the launch of the commemorations on HMS Illustri-ous, Mr Twigg said: "The Falklands campaign was one of the most memorable events in post-war British history. The liberation of the Islands was a huge achievement by our Forces, operating in harsh conditions 8,000 miles away from

"The commemorations next year will provide us with an opportunity to reflect on the events of 25 years ago. We will take time to remember those who gave their lives to defend the freedom of the Falkland Islands.

'As well as the principal events in London, Pangbourne and Stanley. we anticipate that local communities and veterans groups around the country will organize smaller scale events.

Commemorations will look too at what Islanders have achieved in the 25 years since the conflict.

Official events begin on Liberation Day, Thursday 14 June at the Falkland Islands Memorial Chapel in the grounds of Pangbourne College, Berkshire. This service of Commemoration and Remembrance is held annually on behalf of the Falklands Families Association, but will have special significance in 2007 when it will be attended by senior members of the Royal family, and carried live on BBC.

Later that day (UK time) attention will turn to the Islands and the first of a series of ambitious live link ups with the Islands. A service at Christchurch Cathedral, Stanley will be followed by an Act of Commemoration at the Falklands War Memorial, and British Forces currently based on the Is-



lands will parade through Stanley exercising the Freedom of the City that was bestowed on them by the Falkland Islands Government in 2002

The showpiece event of these commemorations will be on Sunday 17 June. This will consist of a high impact visual event on Horse Guards Parade followed by a march past of veterans and their modern day service counterparts up The Mall to Buckingham Palace to witness a fly past of aircraft from the Falklands era as well as some of those flown by the same squadrons today. Central to the event will be the personal recollections of veterans and Islanders as they tell their stories in their own words.

Community events The community has been invited to come forward with celebratory plans for next year.

At the public meeting held on Tuesday, Cllr Mike Summers said the 2007 Committee has largely dealt with the commemorations planned for June and the November pilgrimage but is now wanting to hear from the community, "...to put forward ideas, whether it's for kids' parties, Scottish ceilidhs, a special craft fair ... we're happy to hear from people.

Penguin News asked Cllr Summers whether June 15, 2007 would be declared a public holiday, in addition to the usual holiday on June 14.

He said the government is "minded" to declare the Friday as a public holiday, "...but first wish to consult the private sector for their views." *RN/PN*

Hydatids should be long gone | BLESMA triathalon a success

CAMP residents will be expected to confirm to the Department of Agriculture (DoA) that they have pilled their dogs with immediate effect.

In an effort to get to the bottom of why hydatid cysts are still being found in sheep and to ensure compliance with dog dosing regulations, the Agricultural Advisory Committee has recommended that dog owners contact Sarah Bowles at the veterinary department, as soon as is reasonably convenient after pilling their dogs.

Senior Veterinary Officer Vic Epstein told the committee that the emphasis should be on dogs in Camp which don't have to be registered and are pilled by their owners

Hydatid cysts were seen in five sheep, coming from five unrelated properties processed at the Sand Bay Abattoir between January and May 2006.

The hydatid eradication scheme has been in place for more than 30 years and, based on the life cycle of the parasite, the disease should have been eradicated from the Falkland Islands more than 20 years ago.

Mr Epstein said there are several possibilities why hydatidosis persists in the Islands, listing number one as noncompliance with regulations, in so far as dogs are not wormed and restricted from access to offal.

There are two possibilities currently under investigation: that there is a residue of hydatids in the



Islands, possibly within foxes, or that the strain of hydatid worm in the Falklands is unique.

Mr Epstein said the introduction of new infections with the importation of new dogs into the lslands is a possibility although dog importation is under a protocol where it is "pilled" before arrival. The hydatid worm is resistant to the pills, however, resistance has not been found anywhere else in the world.

All the people he has consulted about the issue have said that it is not possible to build up a resistance to the Droncit and Drontal pills and have advised that it has to be down to noncompliance, said the Senior Veterinary Officer.

The committee chaired by Councillor Hansen, agreed that it is not unreasonable to ask farmers to make contact to confirm that they are dosing their dogs at the right intervals. "It is in the farmers' interest to rule out non com-pliance," said Mr Hansen.

'No justification for dipping into FIG reserves' say economists

THE Falklands' economy is well managed, according to two economists who recently visited the Islands.

Damian Reeves, the economic advisor for the Overseas Territories Department of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) and Mark Watson, an independent economic consultant, spent two weeks examining whether the government's reserves are set at the right level.

Reporting on their visit. Chairman of Standing Finance Committee, Councillor Mike Summers, said the pair said they could not see any justification for using any part of the reserves for consumption but that, "...there were arguments in favour of using some part of the reserves, if we saw fit, for reinvesting in other parts of the economy."

If this were to happen, potential investments would fall into two areas, Cllr Summers said: "Those that provide a direct financial return, in the same way that investments through the consolidated fund do, and in projects that provide more of an economic return as opposed to an financial return, which is sometimes more difficult to evaluate."

While admitting "nothing revolutionary" came out of the discussions with the economists, Cllr Summers said a number of useful points were made. These will be included in a report from the pair, which is expected to arrive here in ...

Clir Summers said councillors discussed with the economists whether it would be sensible to treat illex income as a windfall rather than budgeting for it: "We say, OK, there will probably be some every year, we don't know what it's going to be so let's budget as a windfall and not assume anything."

Cllr Summers has said for a number of years that the Falklands could do without illex income: "It wouldn't be easy but the longer we go on and the more mature the economy becomes, the easier it will be to try to find a way of budgeting without illex income..."

Mr Reeves and Mr Watson, he

said, thought this would be a useful approach to look at.

Ways in which the Falklands government could mobilise savings was also discussed at some length between the two economists and councillors.

Clir Summers reported: "In most economies, savings that people keep in banks, building societies and wherever else are used to reinvest in that economy and the banks invest them in various ways... Here, if you put your money in the bank, they don't hold it here, they hold it elsewhere so it's invested in someone else's economy, not in ours." He continued, "We were talking

He continued, "We were talking about ways in which savings can be invested in our economy. The direct idea of things like shares (such as in Stanley Services Ltd) is one option. A second option is something like an investment bond you can buy that yields a fixed interest.

"That money is then used to reinvest in projects... The difficulty with that is you have to make sure you find projects that are going to yield a financial return at least as good as the interest you are committed to pay on the bonds."

The economists discussed the possibility of co-financing and sharing risk with the private sector on projects that are most likely to benefit the private sector. Cllr Summers cited the dockyard project as an example: "There's every reason to think the private sector might be interested in some investment in that because they can see they could get some reasonable commercial return..."

He said there is, however, a general feeling that the private sector is, to an extent, risk averse. "It's not meant to be a criticism; it's a reflection of where the economy currently is and how it has developed.

"I know some people will say that's not true but when you start looking at major projects and infrastructure, we tend not to be able to mobilise private capital very easily..."

Sceptics in the community have said that Mr Reeves and Mr Watson were brought to the Falklands to find a way to secure funds from the reserves for the construction of a new administration building for the government, however Clir Summers is adamant this is not the case.

case. "The motivation for this visit came from me and I'm not promoting the administration building so there could be no link between one and the other. Clearly, when the economists were here those people who are interested in promoting the new administration building will have talked to them about it. We did talk about it briefly when we met but we didn't dwell on it to any great length."

However he acknowledged something will need to be done about rationalising government accommodation: "If the dockyard project proceeds then there will have to be some new build, at least for the Public Works Department.

"If we're doing it for the PWD, it would almost certainly make sense to look at doing it for some other parts of government. Which ones they would be, I couldn't say off hand."

The issue of government accommodation does need attention, Cllr Summers said.

"If we have continued population expansion - and there's no reason to believe we won't have at least some continued monitored growth - there will come a time when we will need some more space in the hospital. Nobody has tried to make a case of putting additional capacity anywhere other than effectively on the same site. To do that, you've either got to go northwards, which is where the Secretariat is, or eastwards, which is where people's homes are. Those are the only options and we have to think in the big term and be visionary about this.

term and be visionary about this. "It would be madness if we built the next ward for KEMH somewhere up on the hill behind Cable and Wireless, it has to be on the same site. So in terms of broader thinking about the planning of the town and where things go, moving the administration from where it is might be something that we'll have to do..." The post of Economic Advisor

The post of Economic Advisor to the Falkland Islands Government has been vacant for eighteen months and councillors asked the visiting consultants whether the post should be filled once again. On this, Cllr Summers said, they

On this, Cllr Summers said, they were not very clear. "They said that having access to economic advice is clearly a good thing but whether or not you need to have someone full time to get it was another issue. Maybe we could spend our money better by having someone, somewhere giving advice on tap..." He added that councillors feel the

He added that councillors feel the resources currently available to the Chief Executive are inadequate for him to properly do his job: "We are looking at ways in which we can improve the capacity of his office to do the policy and economic work that needs doing."

The visit by the economists was funded by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

Visiting veterans reflect on their time in the Falklands

THE six British veterans who returned to the Islands this month have gone home happier people.

They flew out of the Islands on Tuesday, after a week of remembrance and getting to know Falkland Islanders. They participated in the Remembrance Sunday commemorations and chatted briefly with four visiting Argentine veterans.

Penguin News caught up with the British visitors on the eve of their departure.

Gary Western served with C Company 40 Commando Royal Marines during the 1982 war. He was 20 when he served and was involved on the attack on Mt Harriet. He was accompanied on this visit by his wife of twenty-three years. Heather.

Gary said serving in the Falklands changed his perception on life - "I don't have a lot of sympathy for people and I don't suffer fools gladly..."

He said he knew in 1982 that there was more to the Islands than just the conflict, "...which is one of the reasons why I wanted to come back."

He and Heather were both overwhelmed by the welcome they received. Heather commented. "From a UK perspective, the Falklands was a bleak inhospitable place but coming here now. I realise it's not. It's certainly very rugged and windswept but not bleak and the hospitality we've had has been just fantastic. And the weather is so much better than we were expecting!"

John Stubbs was a combat engineer with 9 Para, attached to A Company in the battle for Mt Longdon. He said he had lots of vivid memories of the battle but once he got on the mountain, he found "it's not as cinemascope as I thought it was..."

It was important for him to retrace his steps, he said. "I was in my own little bubble and didn't know the bigger picture - I needed to find out what happened." However, he added, "I got frustrated not being able to find exactly where I had been, there were certain places I recognised and knew I'd been but I was still frustrated."

Despite this, he said the return trip has been "fantastic", particularly the welcome from Islanders. "That was very moving and unexpected."

Paul Stanton was a seventeen year old serving with the Welsh Guards in 1982 and was on Sir Galahad when it was bombed.

Unsurprisingly, this traumatic event had a dramatic effect on his life and he was diagnosed with PTSD two years ago, following a nervous breakdown.

Since then he has received treatment through the charity Combat Stress, who also run a care home for sufferers and clearly this trip has had the desired effect - "I've got closure now."

Paul enthused: "I love the Islands - they are everything I hoped for and more. The people are so friendly." He is already planning to return to the Falklands next year.

Alan Thomas also served with the Welsh Guards and he said his main objective for this trip was to head to Fitzroy. "I lost my platoon sergeant who I was very close to, so it was nice to come back and pay my respects."

Alan actually landed at Bluff Cove with a machine gun platoon; he carried on with the Royal Marines to Mount Harriet and Two Ststers. "We made the final push to Stanley with the Marines and spent the night of the surrender on Sapper Hill, entering Stanley the following day," he explained.

he is delighted with the Falklands of today: "You've come so far, it's unbelievable." Another Welsh Guard, Dave

Another Welsh Guard, Dave Lewis, was also on Sir Galahad. He was injured in the bombing but continued to serve in the Army for many years afterwards.

He believes the efforts of the British Forces in 1982 were completely worthwhile: "These are British isles; no matter if you're 8.000 miles away, you are our people. Our boys came down here and had sworn to protect our people...the freedom



of the British people means a lot to everybody - whether Army, Navy or Air Force.

The only regret he has, "...is that three Islanders were lost."

Along with Paul and Alan. Dave took part in a service at Fitzroy, an important part of the visit. He commented. "A weight was taken off my shoulders and my mind. It took me twenty-four years to come back and I wanted to say to the boys who were left behind here, 'you're not forgotten, we know where you are'. Now the Islanders are looking after you."

Barry Brookes feels the same way. He served aboard HMS Britliant during the war and lost close friends.

"One of my friends was on the Ardent and I never got to say goodbye to him. I take my hat off to that ship - she was still firing as she went down. I saw the casualty list come out and saw my mate's name but I hadn't time to grieve then. Seeing the bodies ready for burial at sea. I felt that awful thing of not having said goodbye to my friends."

Hower, within two days of returning to the Falklands this month, he was okay. Barry said. "I would sit on my hosts' verandah every night having a cigarette and a glass of beer, and talk to my friends. I knew I could go home knowing my friends are in safe hands."

Carmella Cowley lost her hushand, John Pashley of 9 Para in the war. She remarried twenty-two years ago and now has three children, but she had unfinished business to deal with in the South Atlantic. "I wanted to get things settled in my head. I couldn't comprehend what it was all about and needed to come and see it for myself, to lay ghosts to rest."

Incredibly, although she lost her husband here. Carmella never felt resentment towards the Falklands: "Over the years people have asked me if it was worth it and my answer has always been, of course it was worth it. If I had said no, John's death would have been in vain."

She was nervous about coming down: "I've never been able to face it but all of a sudden, about three months ago, I needed to." John was interred in the Falklands then repatriated in November 1982. This delay. Carmella said, caused her problems in years to come. "All sorts of questions go through your head.."

However, these questions have now been answered. "I can't believe how generous everyone is, how grateful, how friendly. I'm amazed at the size of the Islands and the weather. I'll go back feeling positive about everything, it has done me good. I needed to do it and now I can move on."

Let's save Bodie Creek bridge

AFTER reading the poem by JS Smith we felt compelled to also add our voices to hopefully kick start something being done about preserving Bodie Bridge, for future generations of Falklanders and visitors.

We are bridge enthusiasts. There are many of us throughout the world who fit their holidays and travel around the chance to view a significant bridge. In short, many major bridges are tourist attractions as well as serving their original purpose of spanning a waterway or gorge for foot, road or rail traffic. For example when you think of San Francisco you automatically think of the Golden Gate Bridge, Many bridge enthusiasts will spend their holiday savings to travel to places around the world to view, photograph and travel across bridges.

Bodie Creek is a steel suspension bridge, and is often quoted in literature I have read, as being the most southerly in the world. Suspension bridges are amongst the most spectacular of bridges, and the Bodie Creek Bridge is right up there, in our view: a major Falkland Islands tourist attraction, assembled and built here by Falklanders for a uniquely practical Falkland purpose. the movement of sheep between Walker Creek and Goose Green farms. (This is noteworthy in its own right. I haven't heard of any other bridges in the world, of this size and age, built primarily for the movement of sheep, and never having formed roads to them.)

When I first came to the Fakkands in 2001, it was one of the first places I wanted to visit, and it certainly featured on Fakkland websites and in tourism brochures I read. For this reason alone it is worth preserving, historical significance aside. (What was featured on the cover of the 2005 Telephone directory?)

Back in 2000, a series of three stamps was issued featuring Falklands bridges, from paintings by Mike Peake (sadly no longer with us). They were Bodie Creek Bridge, Malo Bridge and Fitzroy River Bridge. All historically significant, and all no longer open, and in dire need of even minimal repair. To a non-engineer's eye it would seem in the Bodie Creek and Malo River bridges' cases, a sand-blast followed by a coat of paint to help preserve the steel work from further deterioration would be a start.

It is almost like the Falklands treats their bridges like they view the wrecks in Stanley harbour, promoted as tourist attractions, but left to the elements.

Yes, I realise that all three bridges no longer serve the purpose for which they were built, and that many would say why spend money on something that is no longer in use. However if you applied that logic to all things, historical significance would be meaningless, and we would have no heritage.

For example. Stonchenge, other than historical significance, serves no practical purpose in today's world, yet because of the hundreds of thousands of tourists it attracts each year, and their tourist pounds and dollars they spend, the National Trust and the British tax payer will be spending millions of pounds to re-route motorway traffic in an attempt to preserve it into the foreseeable future.

Bodie Creek Bridge doesn't require millions of pounds, just the desire to preserve it as a starting point. If there is no money in the government coffers I'm sure if the powers that be appealed for overseas corporate sponsorships to preserve the bridge, they would be soon found. Another avenue is the internet, as there are bridge enthusiasts all over the planet and, just like train enthusiasts, their interests don't begin and end with solely what is within their own country.

Finally, look at the nationwide poll held in the UK this year. The second greatest Briton of all time (Winston Churchill led the poll), was none other than Isanbard Kingdom Brunnel, an engineer, a great builder of bridges, along with railroads and ships. His bridges such as the Clifton Suspension Bridge in Bristol are national treasures, still in use, and get the respect and maintenance they deserve.

If you do nothing else this summer, at least go and have a look at Bodie Creek Bridge, and see what will be lost if nothing is done soon. Rex Eagle and Trudi Felton Eagle Stanley

Foreign Office man 'lacks vision'

1 WOULD like to respond to the article in *Penguin News* of October 13 and the comments made by Mr Leigh Turner of the Foreign Office.

I am a bit surprised that he has not been picked up on his comments by anyone else, but after some consideration, feel that his lack of vision and inexperience of our situation cannot go unanswered. I am in full agreement that co-

I am in full agreement that cooperation with Argentina is important on the issue of fisheries, not just for the sake of the economy, but more seriously, for conservation of stocks, but his suggestion that the Gibraltar/Spain agreement model is a "good" one, is farcical. For one thing, it is so new, it is untested and therefore can't be held

For one thing, it is so new, it is untested and therefore can't be held up as any sort of "model" for another two very different countries to consider, never mind follow.

to consider, never mind follow. It forms part of a reluctantly created 'Plan B'; (the original Plan A being one of *shared sovereignty*, which the people of Gibraltar rejected in a referendum in 2002).

We learn from this that little has changed in the Foreign Office from the days of Carrington/Ridley and company to those of now with the likes of Jack Straw/Geoff Hoon and others all ready to dispose of the last outposts.

He fails to acknowledge, in his remarks about us having a "sovereignty umbrella," that the last thing the current Argentine government wants to do is adhere to it, which makes any sort of "co-operation" or negotiation difficult.

His remark that Argentina needs to "build Falkland Islanders' confidence up over a prolonged period", is wholly inconsistent with any sort of historical reality and one that I hope our elected members took good note of.

Anyone recalling the Argentine efforts in the 1970s (and those more recently of the late Mr Di Tella), will know that patience is not a virtue in the politics over there and Falklands "confidences" will be built, as always, as he must have encountered himself during his visit, in the shadow of petulant, belligerent bullying from what is essentially, an aggressive neighbour from hell. Argentina cannot even build confidence in its own electorates, so I wonder how he thinks they might ever manage to do it for us?

He overlooks the major issue for Argentina; that Falkland Islanders (Kelpers) are and always will be, a second class or lower form of humanity and until the Foreign Office officials and any would-be political problem-solver, recognizzes the racist and class-distinction aspects of Argentine political and social doctrines, then we, unfortunately, will have to put up with nonsense soundbites of this sort.

Notice how he states "moved forward" instead of "resolve", in regard to controversial issues (that haven't altogether gone down well in Gibraltar). I hope that our elected representatives maintain more of a vigilance on any potentially sneaky London thinking, than perhaps we will see from the 'Pink Pile' in Buenos Aires.

Never mind how Nestor Kirchner affects us: for a useful insight into his mind in his own country, the comments made about his time as Santa Cruz provincial governor, by John Blake, in his book, The Story of Patagonia, make very enlightening reading. Whilst it is crucial for conser-

Whilst it is crucial for conservation that efforts continue to get reasoned understanding established in arrogant minds, personally, I do not believe it is going to be in the interests of the Falklands, if Argentina gives up its claim to the Islands, or reduces its immature and third-world posturing on the international stage; were they to do so. I believe we would see a Jumbo-load of Foreign Office officials arriving here to coax us into accepting any sort of grease-coated olive branches...

It should be remembered that European Union co-operation drives many of the factors that cause the likes of the Gibraltar agreement to be formed, there are far larger populations involved, with greater ethnic mixes and exceedingly large financial issues at stake, but, above all that, even the Spanish government is a good deal more 'mature' than any which has ever governed Argentina.

Yes, I am sure that Gibraltar's inhabitants will appreciate having their own dialling code, and reduced phone tariffs, but the border controls have gone and Gibraltar now shares its airport with Spain.

In a move that stinks of twofaced double-dealing. Britain is to look into compensating 6,000 Spanish workers who lost their pensions when Franco sealed the border.

Just wait and see, Britain won't realise just how useful Gibraltar was and is, until a better sort of UK government realises they've lost any kind of say or control in the place completely. Wake up, people, wake up!

In the meantime, would the last ape to leave, please take the flag down...

REMEMBRANCE Sunday was commemorated by Islanders at the weekend with a church service and Act of Remembrance at the Cross of Sacrifice.

The commemorations followed the same format as previous years, beginning with the main church service at Christ Church Cathedral.

During the service a collection was held for the Earl Haig Fund.

The Act of Remembrance at the Cross of Sacrifice on Ross Road East was attended by more than 150 people and incorporated guards from all three Armed Services and the Falkland Islands Defence Force.

The service began following the arrival of the Commander of British Forces and His Excellency the Governor.

Prayers were read by representatives of the Clergy then the Roll of Honour was read out by the Chief Executive, Mr Chris Simpkins.

Lawrence Binyon's words were read by the Governor before the *Last Post* was played by Drum Major Paul Jones of the Royal Welch Fusiliers The Victory Green saluting guns were fired to mark the beginning and end of the two minute silence, then Drum Major Jones played *Reveille*.

A number of wreaths were then laid by representatives of the miliary and civilian communities and visiting veterans.

The service concluded with prayers.

What you think of Councillors one year after election

COUNCILLOR Richard Davies sailed through the general election a year ago with a majority of votes but has failed to maintain his popularity, according to a vox pop conducted by *Penguin News*.

It was a close run contest between Councillor Mike Summers and Councillor Andrea Clausen as we asked the question. "which councillor would you be most likely to approach with a problem or issue?" Councillor Clausen obtained top

Councillor Clausen obtained top position with 30% saying they found her most approachable. "She is a people person." said Tara Francis.

people person," said Tara Francis. Councillor Summers, who was slightly ahead of Councillor Clausen in the General Election with 477 votes to her 466, slid into second place in the approachability stakes with 23%.

Councillor Richard Davies who enjoyed a landslide victory at the election with 546 votes has to be content with 546 of constituents saying that they would approach him; 5% were happy to contact Councillor Cockwell ("because he always agrees with you," gupped one voter); 6% Councillor Robertson; 5% each for Camp Councillors Stevens. Rendell and Hansen (bearing in mind that approximately 9% of those who took part are Camp constituents). 3% said they would be happy to contact all of the elected councillors and 4% said they would not contact any; the remainder did not have an answer.

The survey was conducted in the Seafish Chandlery and the FIC Foodhall foyer on Friday, to mark the end of the council's first year in office.

The overall view of this council's performance over the last year was not particularly high with 47% being less than happy to date. 36% consider them to be average and only 14% rated their performance as good.

So, how have the five fresh faces that we elected a year ago performed so far. according to the public?

43% put Councillors' Robertson, Clausen, Rendell, Davies and Stevens in the average bracket while 26% say that their performance is poor. 11% say performance so far is good: 6% medioere; 3% stated that they find their attitude "dictatorial" and 5% thought "backbone-less" summed them up; 2% of those questioned sad the new councillors are "enthustastic."

Greater transparency in government decision-making was a popular subject among candidates last year in the lead up to the General Election on November 18; we asked the public if they think there is a difference now to a year ago.

A resounding "no" was the answer with 60% saying they could see no change. Only 16% felt that there was more transparency; 5% said if there was change it was not noticeable and a further 5% said they did not know; 3% felt efforts were being made to make decision making more transparent and 5% said that there is certainly more access to information.

People were keen to talk about their perceptions of Legislative Council and it is praiseworthy that nearly everyone had a view - a very small number of people opted not to answer the questions because they were "not interested" or "didn't care," In total 60 people responded.

Several people thought that the

five new councillors were inclined to take criticism "personally" while June Besley-Clark said she had thought they were going to be good but that they are "being led by the nose by the old councillors."

Opinions differed on the overall performance of the council: Tosh McLeod said the entire council was not robust enough and was in need of some backbone, "...it may have been removed when they were elected." he said, while Moira Crutckshank felt they were "overly confident."

Pensioners Billy and Evelyn Poole have seen a few councils to measure this lot by and say they are "no different." As for approachability. Bill says he has asked a couple of the more experienced councillors to deal with hand rails for access to public buildings and nothing has been done. "I might have to try one of these new ones," he said.

A former councillor himself, Tim Blake sees the council as "setting in now," At the beginning they wanted to change everything even if it actually worked, he said, adding that he would still like to see more debate

Neil Watson rates this council's performance as "poor" because of the holiday credit scheme reductions and "the waste of money on the wool co-operative," while Sally Ellis says she is pleased overall with council and says the introduction of five new councillors was worth it.

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WHY? BECAUSE AT HOMECARE, WE CARE!

THERE is a lot of confusion and conflicting advice about when babies are ready to start weaning and to be introduced to solid food. The word 'solids' is used to de-

scribe foods that are not milk such as fruit and vegetables. The World Health Organisation recommends that babies are purely breastfed un-til six months of age. The Department of Health (DOH) in the UK agrees with this, but accepts that all babies are different with some babies being ready for solids sooner than others. However, the DOH strongly recommends that solids are not started before 20 weeks at the earliest.

Up to the age of 20 weeks a baby's system can only cope with breast milk or infant formula which provides all the nourishment they need. If milk feeds are replaced too soon babies may lose out on impor-tant nutrients and calories. Previous generations used to start their babies on solids as young as four weeks, but we now know that starting solids too early can have a det-rimental effect on the health of the baby and in later life. Although a baby given solids early may appear fine at the time, there are increased risks of developing eczema, allergies, chest infections, diarrhoea and obesity.

There is an assumption that introducing solids will help babies sleep through the night. This may work, but this decision must be weighed against the future effect on your baby's health. Babies can become unsettled and distressed with abdominal pains due to the immaturity of their digestive systems. They cannot produce all the enzymes needed to digest starchy foods and fats at an early age, there-fore foods other than milk before 20 weeks could put a strain on the baby's kidneys. Increasing the amount of milk or number of feeds whether breast or bottle fed, is by far the healthier option.

Many parents will be advised by others that when the baby starts putting his fists into his mouth that he is hungry and ready for solids. This is a normal stage in a baby's development and means that the baby has now mastered the skill of controlling their hands to the point where he can get them into his mouth. Babies may also chew on their fists, once they have the skill because their gums are sore rather than due to hunger.

Ongoing research shows that babies who are breastfed do not need to start solids until six months. Changes occur in the baby's mouth at about six to nine months which enable the baby to change from drinking to developing cating skills. Although teething can start well before six months most babies get their first teeth after six months which helps them with chewing and biting.

A baby is highly unlikely to become overweight on just milk. Babies are ready for solids when:

they are 20 - 26 weeks old

they no longer automatically push food out of their mouth with their tongue

they begin to pick up food and put it into their own mouth

they can sit up, show an interest in what others are eating and may seem keen to try tasting appropriate foods

How to introduce solids

The baby's digestive system can adjust to solids best if they are introduced slowly, trying one new food at a time. For a baby of 20 weeks this means starting with as little as half a teaspoonful of baby rice per day. Baby rice may be mixed with expressed breast milk, infant formula or cool boiled water to the necessary texture. Baby rice is the most gentle and easiest of foods for a baby to digest and allergies to baby rice are almost unheard of. Foods containing gluten (found in wheat, oats, barley and rye) should be avoided until six months. The baby's digestive system is too immature to digest gluten and diarrhoea and abdominal discomfort often occur. If you choose to buy commercial baby cereals or rusks it is important that you avoid any containing gluten until six months.

Home made foods are cheaper and tend to be more nutritious. They do not contain the additives, preservatives and colourings included in commercially manufactured baby foods. Home prepared foods should not have salt added as this can damage a baby's kidneys. By cooking your own foods you are then able to offer one taste at a time, rather than overwhelming your baby's taste buds with shop bought products where several flavours have been mixed together.

Vegetables make good first foods. Carrots, polatoes, parsnips or sweet potato can be boiled and then blended to a puree or mashed until the correct texture for your baby's ability. For babies of about six months, mashing food down with a fork to a comfortable texture may be enough. Expressed breast milk or formula may be used to make the texture softer or cooler if necessary. At six months babies often have the skill to cope well with finger foods such as cooked carrots or soft pieces of pear or mango.

Babies are born with stores of iron which last for several months, but once on solids iron-rich foods must be included in the weaning process. To ensure that your baby is obtaining iron from food that his body can absorb, after six months you can include red meat (unless vegetarian), pulses (peas and beans) and iron-fortified cereals. Vitamin C (in fresh fruits and fresh or frozen vegetables) at the same meal helps your baby absorb the iron.

When first introducing solids consider offering them to your baby after a milk feed when he is calm and satisfied. Offering solids before the milk will often upset and confuse a hungry baby.

The introduction of solids should, albeit messy, be enjoyable and fun for everyone!

This is just a short insight into weaning to provide you with infor-mation that will help you make the right and healthy choice for your baby.

A trip down memory large

Fifteen years ago, November 15, 1991

PENGUIN News understands that proposals to extend the Falkland Con-tinental Shelf are already in the Islands. Extending the shelf makes it easier for the Islands to control any oil exploration within its waters and means that legislation to control what could become a mega-million asset can go ahead.

Four people are injured when a Land Rover rolls over on Surf Bay beach. Darrel McGill suffers severe facial injuries and had to be transferred to hospital in the UK.

Two men from the fishery patrol boat *Falklands Desire* has a lucky escaped after being swept into the sea. The incident happened about 35 miles south west of Cape Meredith. Fishery office Jon Stafford was leaving the Spanish trawler *Nuevo Alcocero* when he was swept off the boarding ladder. Herman Morrison tried to prevent Jon falling in, but was himself dragged into the water. The men were only in the water for

a matter of minutes before being rescued by their colleagues. Members of the Planning and Building Committee give their bless-ing for the Stanley congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses to establish a meeting place in the town.

Eight new flats are to be built on the Jersey Estate, despite considerable opposition - 72 people sign a protest petition. The main objections are to the increased population density in the area, the extra traffic and

noise that will result, and possible parking problems. Rules covering the import of meat into the Islands are to be re-viewed. The investigation will also consider the real value, if any, of EEC certificates accompanying cargo. The result may affect the military as well as the local market.

Licence applications for the first season of 1991 included 217 applications for illex, 55 for finfish and 16 for loligo as a first choice. The number was the same as the first season of 1991, and is similar in that interest in finfish licences remains strong. Applications for loligo li-cences, however, are comparatively low, reflecting the depressed state of the market.

Ten years ago, November 20, 1996 A LACK of accommodation, office space, warehousing and a pool of skilled labour are all factors identified by businessmen from the Aber-deen Trade Mission to the Falklands as the Islands biggest weaknesses in the light of a potential oil industry. The nineteen businessmen who have various connections (mainly in support roles) with the oil industry arrived in the Islands on November 15, beginning a week of familtarisation with the Islands infrastructure.

Despite no immediate hope for change in the poor state of wool prices, potential small farmers in the Falklands are not in short supply. The Chief Executive confirmed yesterday that competition for Landholdings land, for both sale and lease, is very strong.

Acting Governor, Mr Andrew Gurr has the pleasant task, of renam-ing the Norwegian fishing vessel. *Tjaldur II*, as the *Island Queen*. The arrival of the vessel in the Islands heralds a huge commercial step forward for JBG Falklands Limited, who have formed a new company, Island Fisheries Holding Limited, in partnership with the leclandic own-ers of the vessel, *Kristian Goodmansun*.

Put the mixture in a cool place for a couple of hours or overnight if possible.


Fill the sausage casing as normal or form into sausage shapes, roll in flour and use as skinless sausages.

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Wool report - week ending November 10 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices slipped considerably at sales in Australia and South Africa last week. In New Zealand however, prices for broad cross bred types held firm.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" prices decreased by between 6 and 21 pence per kilogram clean for lots of fibre diameter 18 through to 32 microns.

For fleece wool finer than approximately 26 micron, price falls trimmed approximately two thirds off last weeks gains while for lots between 28 and 32 micron, price falls took current prices to levels below that of the previous week. However, this stated, it is important to keep overall gains achieved over the last few week's losses'

when considering last week's losses! The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down 12 pence per kilogram at 331.3 p/kg clean compared to last weeks closing level of 343.1 pence/ kg clean.

It should be noted that price falls where severe on the first day of selling last week, with minor gains occurring later in the week.

in South Africa 86% of the

9.988 bales on offer were sold. In Australia 83% of the 54.682 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 5.053 bales of crossbred wool of which 88% was sold.

Sales continue next week in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia with a combined offering of almost 113,000 bales.

Stanley went ahead in the 30th minute after being awarded a corner kick. Newcomer, Chilean Andreas Balladares sent in a fierce low cross from the resulting kick and Spurs Henry in typical fashion appeared from nowhere to fire the ball past Carlisle's goalkeeper Graham.

However, a team is never more vulnerable than when after scoring a goal and Stanley were pegged back a few minutes later when Halpin again showed his class, cutting inside

his marker and playing the ball across the penalty area. Joshua saved the first shot from Lamberton but the Army's Mike Williams scored from the rebound, to bring the scores level at 1-1.

Joshua had to be alert a few minutes later and managed to parry the ball which just evaded the onrushing Williams. The Carlisle/MPA select made

several substitutions at half-time but it was Stanley who had the best opportunity after Balladares took a free-kick but Spurs Henry blasted the ball high and wide.

Stanley survived a late surge from the Carlisle/MPA team and goalkeeper Joshua bravely punched the ball clear following a corner kick

There were several candidates for Man of the Match but Stanley's Captain and central defender Doug Clark's splendid last ditch tackle on Williams, when the MPA player looked certain to score, won him the award.

The game ended in a draw at 1-1 and Carlisle's John Halpin said that the standard of Stanley's play had been unexpected and he likened the local side to a good non-league outfit in England. The MPA team Manager Sgt Joe

Stanfield of the RAF said that Stanley was the best team they had seen at MPA for some time and their fitness level had surprised him.

Stanley's recently appointed manager Jimmy Curtis said that they were not getting carried away by this excellent result but admitted being very pleased with his players performance, particularly as they had played the best that MPA had to offer.

'Crab love': Shackleton Scholars study crab and snailfish sexual parasitism

TWO visiting scientists spent a fortnight in Stanley last month, working with Dr Paul Brickle of the Fisheries Department to study the reproductive parasitism of a snailfish on local crabs. *Paralomis* granulosa.

A Falkland snailfish species (Family Liparidae) lays its eggs inside the gill cavity of the crabs, where they develop and hatch safely, defended by the crabs to the fish's advantage. The crabs, the basis of a small local fishery, are captured by Chris May (George Island) and processed by Falkland Fresh Ltd in Stanley. Drs David Stein (Oregon State Uni-

Drs David Stein (Oregon State University, USA) and Christoph Held (Alfred Wegener Institute, Germany) met Paul in the winter of 2004 on a US National Science Foundation-funded research cruise aboard the "NB Palmer", which visited Stanley in June of that year.

David, a specialist in snailfish classification and biology, was working with a BAS scientist on South Georgia on snailfish parasitism of crabs there, and Christoph (a crab expert) and Paul (a fisheries biologist) became interested in his study.

When Paul returned here after the cruise, he found that snailfish eggs were common in P granulosa. After a meeting in Maine. USA in August of 2005, the three submitted a proposal to the Shackleton Scholarship Fund to study the phenomenon here. It was approved, and the three spent the last two weeks of October intensively working on the problem.

They sampled crabs at both Falkland Fresh and from Chris Mays' crab boat, the *Theo*, and were able to collect eggs in all stages of development.

Their preliminary results seem to show that the fish lay eggs only in males and the largest females and that more

than one fish may lay eggs in a single crab. Also, it seems as though the eggs have an effect on the health of the crab by reducing water flow over the gills of the crab.

The study will last for another year, and there are many more questions to be answered, including the identity of the snailfish, how the fish identify crabs that are suitable and time egg-laying to match the crab's molt cycle, and how long it takes the eggs to develop and hatch.

The three investigators hope to obtain future funding to enable them to answer at least some of the many other questions about this possibly unique behaviour



"Dumbarton Castle would like to thank both Sqn Ldr Norfield and Major Mahy for their help in carrying out the memorial service."





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Islander crash at West Point

ISLANDER Bravo India, an aircraft from the government air service (FIGAS) fleet, sustained extensive damage whilst landing at West Point Island at the weekend.

The Commander of the aircraft. Tom Chater, and the two passengers, Roddy and Lily Napier, were uninjured in the accident, which occurred on Sunday, November 19. That afternoon, an accident investigation team from the Civil Aviation Department and sentor members of FIGAS staff were flown to the island by 78 Squadron's Sea King helicopter.

Following an inspection at the scene, the FIGAS staff found that Bravo India's port engine and undercarriage had rotated down and rearwards during touchdown. The wing had also rotated down and aft resulting in the propeller and wing tip striking the ground. A FIGAS spokesperson commented. "The aircraft wing is a write-off; this was confirmed by the aircraft manufacturers, Britten Norman, early on Monday morning. "However, the resulting stress

to the aircraft fuselage and subsequent damage to the integrity of the fuselage remains unclear as this cannot be determined until the hull has been returned to Stanley for further inspection."

Bravo India has been moved clear of the West Point air strip, the use of which will be curtailed pending inspection by the local aerodrome authorities, and the offloading of fuel still remaining in the aircraft's fuel tanks. A recovery programme to bring the aircraft back to Stanley has been initiated.

The FIGAS spokesperson said an investigation into the cause of the accident remains on-going by the Civil Aviation Department: "At this stage it is difficult to predict when the investigation will be concluded and what any recommendations will be."

With the decrease in airframe availability, and subsequent pressure on both operations and maintenance staff, FIGAS says there might be some disruption to its service during this coming tourist season, "...although FIGAS will ensure that any disruption will be kept to the minimum.

"It is expected that for the majority of the season there should be three airframes available."

The spokesperson said FIGAS was grateful to, "...all who assisted during the incident, in particular the residents of West Point for their hospitality, and 78 Squadron and British International for arranging availability of their helicopters."

Holberg 'stable'

THE owners of the *Holberg*, the trawler wrecked in Port Purvis, are in negotations with salvage companies. Government officials met the marine

surveyor late last week after he had spent two days examining the vessel, together with the *Holberg's* Captain and Chief Engineer

Director of Fisheries, John Barton reported, "Their view was that the vessel was quite stable in its current postnon. They confirmed that there was very little fuel leaking from the vessel during the time of their inspection, and they expressed the view that further leaks were unlikely. There was some oil leaking from an oil drum, and they thought that some fuel (marine gas oil) may have leaked from the small service tank."

He added that the *Holberg's* owners hope to be able to reveal their plans for fuel and vessel removal soon.

Councillor Richard Davies said it is a "frustratingly slow" process but the government is putting pressure on the company to get the fuel and vessel removal started.

Criticism has been levelled at the government's apparent lack of action to contain any spill around the vessel. Cllr Davies said it is most urgent to get the fuel off before it leaks and that the use of local resources was considered by councillors; however they have decided not to do this, "...as to send the (coastal shipping vessel) *Tamar* into Port Purvis, an area that has not been surveyed in 100 years, could create a bigger disaster."

Cllr Davies added that he was sad to hear there had been reports of looting from the trawler; a spokesinan for the police confirmed the theft of items from the *Holberg* had been reported.

Equal fees for students will save 'a serious amount'

COUNCILLORS have welcomed a proposal to enable students from the Overseas Territories (OTs) to be treated as home students for fee purposes at institutions in England announced by Higher Education Minister Bill Rammell this week.

The proposal means that from 2007/08, students from the Falkland Islands and other OTs will be charged the home fee rate for their Further Education and undergraduate degree courses at colleges and universities in England.

Holder of the Education portfolio, Councillor Richard Stevens said he was delighted with the news. While unable to give a definitive answer on how much this move will save the government, he commented, "If, for argument's sake, 35 students go away next year, it would be over £200,000 saved. It's a serious amount."

He said the Board of Education would like to see the money this move will save reinvested in education, however he added, "...the other councillors might think we have to put it back in the pot."

When asked if this could mean more students are sent to the UK

for further and higher education, or that qualifying standards could be lowered ClIr Stevens commented, "At the moment we are doing work with the further and higher education qualifications... working on things like work ethics rather than increasing or lowering the points students need to go to college.

"Obviously there are people who feel we should be giving other opportunities to children in other areas - such as more opportunities in vocational training and to lower the points. It's part of a much bigger picture"

IF I had a quid for every time I've heard the comment "...half a million for two hundred hours community service..." I'd have, well, a pretty heavy purse.

I am surprised our letters page this week contains so little comment on the outcome of last week's proceedings for, judging by what people have said to me, there is a hell of a lot of dissatisfaction around.

I hope there is going to be an inquiry held into this episode; the logic behind how these prosecutions were deemed to be in the public's best interests should certainly be shared.

The investigation and subsequent proceedings are rumoured to have cost as much as half a million pounds (although the government cur-rently maintains the total is closer to £250,000). Is the conviction of these two police officers value for money? Would the public's interest not have been better served with strict but transparent disciplinary proceedings?

It is vital that we investigate allegations of wrong doing by civil servants in positions of authority, it is dangerous and utterly wrong to ignore them. However, whether or not these instances should become criminal matters is another issue.

No one wants to see officers getting away with improper behaviour and this episode has significantly damaged public confidence in the police - however I doubt many people wanted to see Mr Morris and Mr Butler facing prison either.

Disciplinary proceedings - conducted with as great a level of transparency as possible and in which the outcome is widely publicised could surely have been a more appropriate way to deal with this. Had such proceedings confirmed wrongdoing - and, judging by the outcome in court, we can assume they would have - the officers involved could have been dismissed from office and the matter dealt with more timeand cost-effectively.

On that subject, why were officers from the Metropolitan Police commissioned to conduct the investigation when there were surely qualified people within the Military Police who could have done the job. at less expense?

Justice has now run its course but it has left a feeling of bitterness and discontent. Granted, no one foresaw Mr Morris's illness, but the prosecution hasn't come out of this smelling of roses. The eagerness shown to discontinue the joint charge of perverting the course of justice makes one wonder what it was the prosecution was concerned was going to come out during the trial.

The whole episode has left a bad taste.

Cruise ships customs rules relaxed

THE requirements for cruise ships to clear customs in Camp are to change.

Executive Councillors were told the Customs and Immigration Department is put under a lot of strain at this time of year in particular with the high number of cruise vessels visiting the Falklands.

Acting Governor, Harriet Hall, commented, "The requirement to clear all vessels at their first landfall in the Falklands is particularly onerous.

"Councillors therefore decided that cruise vessels which first call at sites in Camp that are not a designated customs port should be al-

lowed to clear Customs provisionally by sending paperwork, including full passenger lists, 24 hours in advance to the Director of Customs (sic)

The paperwork will then be formalised, and passengers' pass-ports will be stamped, when the vessel arrives at a designated Customs port such as Stanley, Port William or Fox Bay.

Ms Hall said that if the Collector of Customs has any concerns about the vessel's paperwork he can withhold permission for such provisional clearance and arrange for a Customs Officer to attend at the first point of call.

Confusion over 25th anniversary journal


THE UK Chairman of the South Atlantic Medal Association is to meet with the man behind a commemorative journal planned for 2007, Tony Talbott.

Three driving offences dealt with

A TAXI driver has pleaded not guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention. Burnerd Peck (70) entered the

plea in court on Wednesday morn-

The prosecution asked for an adjournment to allow time to consider witness availability and the Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds, obliged She asked Mr Peck whether he would be seeing legal representation, to which he replied he would not.

The case was adjourned until December 11.

Speeding

Also in court on Wednesday, Leon Mitchell pleaded guilty by post to speeding.

In his letter to the court, he admitted driving along Davis Street at 37 miles and hour and, apologised for inconveniencing the police and the court.

Mrs Faulds fined Mr Mitchell £150 and endorsed his licence. He will also pay £70 prosecution costs. Drink driving

A military driver who drove from Stanley to Mount Pleasant while under the influence of alcohol has been fined £400.

Private Paul Graham of 748 Troop pleaded guilty to driving after consuming alcohol on October 29; his lower breath reading was 54 mg/100 ml of blood while the legal limit is 35mg. He was carrying one passenger.

In court on Wednesday, a character statement from a senior of-ficer was read out: Flt Lt Aldrigde said Mr Graham had performed in an "exemplary" manner during his four month tour of the Falklands and had repeatedly shown remorse over this incident which he said was 'out of character."

The Senior Magistrate said she was pleased to note there had not been an accident as a result of Mr Graham's actions. She commented, "It is fortunate no one else was involved although you potentially put your own life, your passenger's and other road users' at risk.

She fined him £400 and endorsed his licence. He will pay £70 prosecution costs and is disqualified from driving in the Islands for 12 months.

Youth court

A Stanley youth had his case adjourned until November 30, for his lawyer to receive instructions.

The youth faces charges of driving without insurance, drivers licence and vehicle licence.

Former detective sergeant given community service

FORMER Detective Sergeant Jonathan Butler pleaded guilty to and was convicted of misconduct in public office on November 13. He submitted his resignation from his post with the Royal Falkland Islands Police on the same day.

A joint charge of perverting the course of justice against Mr Butler and his colleague Superintendent Dave Morris was discontinued at court earlier in the week.

Acting Senior Magistrate Gary Hickinbottom sentenced Mr Butler to 200 hours community service and ordered him to pay £500 costs on Friday November 17. "Given that, by his crime, he diminished the public welfare, it seems to me that it is entirely appropriate that the punishment requires him to give at least something back to that community," said Mr Hickinbottom.

He summarised the events of July 17, 2005 when two police officers attended an altercation between a couple at the Globe Tavern. An off-duty female police officer intervened in the incident, "...possibly in an inappropriate manner and possibly committing an assault on the woman protagonist," he said, adding that the woman later made a statement completely exonerating the actions of the intervener, so far as she was concerned.

The two police officers in attendance produced statements referring to the involvement of their off-duty colleague. Mr Butler was responsible for sending through relevant material to Crown Counsel for advice as to possible action: but, prior to him doing so and to his knowledge - the references had been changed. Mr Hickinbottom said that Mr Butlers misconduct lay in, and only in, "knowingly submitting revised drafts."

He said any misconduct in public office is a serious matter, involving as it does a betrayal of trust placed in the office holder by the public. In this case, Mr Butler was guilty of more than negligence: "he proceeded to submit the redacted statements to Crown Counsel knowing that there was a risk that, by so doing, public confidence in the police force might be undermined. That diminution in the public's perception of the police has, of course, now materialised.

"Furthermore, by his actions, the defendant risked changing the course of any internal police disciplinary enquiry into the conduct of the intervening woman police officer that might have been appropriate. From what I have been told, when that internal investigation was conducted (as it was, on full information), no further action was taken against the intervening police officer - but that does not detract from the harm to such investigation that may have occurred as the result of the covering up of the full evidence."

Mr Hickinbottom said that Mr Butler accepted the facts on which he was sentenced from his initial interview - the primary issues thereafter being his intention and whether he instructed the two police officers to change their statements.

He referred to Mr Butler's good character saying that prior to this matter, he had a long record of good conduct and public service as a police officer and Coroner's officer, noting that during his career, he had commendations from HE the Governor and from a Divisional Commander in the UK from when he was working there. "He is entitled to substantial credit for this record of public service.

"By this conviction, that good character has of course been lost and the investigation into this matter and ultimate conviction has had a devastating effect upon the defendant's life and career."

Mr Hickinbotom said he considered the appropriate sentence to be a community service order requiring Mr Butler to perform 200 hours of unpaid work for the service of the community as a whole, as directed by the relevant officer.

This order involves a substantial restriction on Mr Butler's freedom and was suggested as an appropriate sentence in the pre-sentence report prepared by the Social Welfare Team, he said.

Mr Hickinbottom added a postscript to his sentencing remarks. "The events of the last year that have led to extensive investigations and the trials of the last two weeks must have been difficult for those directly involved, disheartening and disruptive for the police force, and understandably very concerning for the general public.

"It is to be hoped that the relevant authorities will now be able to take appropriate steps to ensure that public confidence in the Royal Falkland Islands Police Force is restored and maintained as quickly and as fully as possible."

Case adjourned due to heavy work load

A PRE TRIAL review took place into the case of Simon De Guevara in the Senior Magistrate's Court on Tuesday.

Mr Guevara was charged with aiding an abetting the commission by Raul Hernandez of sexual penetration without consent in May this year.

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek informed Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds that she sought a further adjournment for the trial date due to the difficulties the Attorney General's Chambers have been currently experiencing trying to find the time to deal with the case.

Keith Watson, defending Mr De Guevera, said that he did not oppose the application.

Mrs Faulds said that Miss Cheek should hold a review of the case with Mr Watson by next Thursday and that a further pre trial review would take place on December 11.

She added. "They are the normal issues we always like to discuss with the person who is in Lord Triesman's position.'

Governors have, on this occasion, been invited to attend some sessions of this year's meeting.

According to a release from Government House, Governor Huckle will also have meetings with officials in the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and with other Governors.

He returns on Saturday, November 25 but will leave, with his wife Helen, on Sunday, November 26 on HMS Endurance for a two day visit to the West Falklands and outlying islands. They will use the ship's helicopter, the press statement said. so that both can visit members of the community there and learn

about issues affecting life in Camp." The Governor will return to Stanley on Tuesday, November 28.

SFC Chairman questions auditing costs

THE COST of auditing for statutory corporations Falklands Landholdings (FLH) and the Development Corporation (FIDC) has been questioned by the Chairman of Standing Finance Committee.

Councillor Mike Summers pointed out to the committee that it normally costs a company in the private sector with a £2million balance sheet. £2-3.000 for their annual audit, however it is consistently costing FLH and FIDC much more: he suggested that there should be a breakdown of man hours during the audit.

David Bell, Partner with Deloitte (External Auditors) attended the committee meeting to update on progress with the audit of the government. He said that progress was good, adding that the readiness of staff for the audit teams arrival was. "the best it has ever been," and thanked them for their preparatory work.

Mr Bell said he intended to write on the issue of audit fees and break down man hours in the audit and the work that is carried out.

He said that the preparatory work in FIDC and FLH had not progressed as far as he would like upon the arrival of his team and this then resulted in them having to undertake work that could have been already done. Mr Bell said this situation is an issue for him. The additional work carried out at FLH and FIDC to complete the audits to date amounts to £3,000 and £4,800 respectively at an hourly rate of between £25 - £40.

Investment performances

Deputy Financial Secretary Keith Padgett put a paper before the committee to provide a summary of the total market values of investments held by FIG which included recent quarterly performances of fund management.

Mr Padgett said the total market value of investments managed on behalf of FIG as of September 30 was £172.9 million. This represents an increase on £3.4 million compared to the market value three months earlier. FIG investment funds are managed by HSBC and Newton.

HSBC have consistently under-performed of late, failing to reach the benchmark while continue to exceed the benchmark.

Mr Padgett said the main reason for the weak performance was disappointing equity stock selection by investment managers and action has been taken to replace the UK equity team.

Councillors discussed the way forward and decided that HSBC should be informed that FIG are not happy, and to effectively put them on notice that they will be looking elsewhere.

Uniforms for PO staff

In a move to improve the public profile of the Post Office £1,500 has been approved for a basic uniform for staff.

Councillors questioned the need for uniforms and suggested a colour coordinated dress code however Chief Executive Chris Simpkins told the committee that it was thought uniforms would "improve the public profile."

Legal costs

A further ± 10.000 has been used to cover legal costs bringing the funding for prosecution counsel and witnesses from the UK for the recent police cases to $\pm 94,000$.

In response to a question from Cllr Summers, who said he understood invoicing from the defence was being arranged promptly Mr Simpkins said he did not know when a final figure would be known for the total cost of the trials.

Cllr Mike Rendell confirmed later in the week that the cost of the trials to government is definitely in excess of £200.00.

Census costs

Additional funding of £8,000 to cover the cost of the recent Census was agreed bringing the total cost to £20,000. Mr Simpkins said there are several issues that need to be discussed regarding the logistics which include the hand delivery and collection of the forms.

Keene media advice

A NUMBER of government officers and Councillors have undertaken some media training in readiness for the Falklands increased coverage in the anniversary year of 2007.

Councillors have discussed electing a different spokesperson on a six monthly basis, and this will be put in place after 2007.

Cllr Robertson said that it is important that the Falklands are presented and perceived in the best possible light throughout next year when there will be increased media coverage and councillors recognised that Clir Summers had a wealth of information to draw on.

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Planning and building news

By Graham France WITH all members (two councillors and five lay) of the committee attending it was a rare occasion when a vote was taken for a decision to be made at the meeting held on November 20.

Stanley Electrical's application for temporary siting of a container for storage was discussed when it was learnt that the structure, previously used for the storage of building materials in connection with a recently built extension to their premises on Dean Street and now needed for general storage. was already in place and that it was therefore a retrospective application for planning permission.

This caused concern and members were asked by chairman Councillor Richard Davies to vote on whether it should be removed now or given temporary approval for a period of six months, with the result of three for removal and four for temporary consent.

four for temporary consent. It was agreed that the applicants be informed that plans for a permanent structure to replace the container must be submitted within that period of six months.

The subject of container siting raised further discussion when members reviewed David and Edith Street's application for a renewal of their temporary planning permission to site such a structure to the rear of 56 Davis Street. It was decided to grant the renewal for a period of six months only and agreed that at the next meeting, scheduled for December 11. Alan Dawson, the Building Adviser, will report under matters arising with details of his activity to get containers removed in Stanley. There will also be discussion on the policy in the Town Plan on these structures.

The following applications received conditional detailed planning permission: Ted and Sybie Summers' submission seeking full consent to follow their initial temporary (one year) approval for the conversion of peat shed to tyre repair shop at I Ross Road West: detailed plans for a dwelling at Moody Brook for Graham Fiddes; government's outfall sewer with collection/pumping station and rising main installation on the north side of Ross Road; twelve garden sheds to be sited at Murray Heights by government; Hamish Jennings' proposal to site a prefabricated building for use as a workshop at the rear of his new dwelling at 9 Davis Street: the construction of a steel shed for storage at Plot 41 on the MPA Road for Michael Wallace; the incorporation of an extra container onto the existing cabin for storage at 24 Boxer Bridge Road for Iain Berntsen who, as a member of the committee, left the meeting during discussion on this item; and Carl and Dianne Freeman's proposed extension to their building at Maiden Haven on Moody Brook Road located west of the Beaver Hangar.


Of four applications for planning permission in principle, only one received such consent. that of Anya Harris's outline application for a dwelling to the rear of 2 Ross Road West. Government's application for the construction of a dwelling at 2 Goss Road is to be referred to Executive Council with the recommendation that outline consent be granted – this due to the proposal being a departure from the Town Plan, the area being shown thereon as a "green space".


Joan Bound's outline application to erect a dwelling at the rear of 10 Barrack Street is making progress, reported Alan Dawson, who added that a further meeting is to be held shortly; whilst Juanita Brock's proposal for consent in principle to erect a dwelling with office accommodation and provide off-street parking at her premises on 20 Drury Street has been withdrawn.

Also withdrawn was Richard and Miranda McKee's application for approval to extend their dwelling at 12 Watson Way, although it was understood that new plans just received were expected to be reviewed at the next meeting.

Only two applications were deferred: Cable and Wireless's proposal to erect a 73.3 metre-high guyed mast and small equipment hut south of the Defence Force's HO on Kiel Canal Road (here it was learnt that objections from the Civil Aviation Department had still to be resolved); and Brendan Gara's submission proposing the construction of a hatchery demonstration unit on a government plot at Moody Brook. It was understood that two objections had been received from members of the public also that more information was required giving details of the proposed buildings and tunnels.

Following Alan Dawson's report on applications received for building permits and a draft advice note on sound insulation for dwellings he had prepared for members to comment upon, Part I of the meeting (which was attended by four members of the public including the writer) concluded shortly before 10am.

THESE words are for everyone who lives in the Falklands and especially for Maxi's friends and acquaintances. I want to take this opportunity to say thanks to all of you; you should know that my heart will always be grateful for all your actions.

Due to the serious accident that happened to my son, I have been trying to obtain assistance from every possible source, which has been very hard for me. However, as you know, a mother's love can move mountains and I will go on fighting for him.

I have received much advice about possible sources of help for Maxi and have searched all of them, but without success. *Teleton* (equivalent to Children in Need in Britain) is the most important source of help for incapacitated people in Chile, but would not accept my son, because of his age. *Teleton*, they say, is only for children.

From the most profound part of me, I thank you again for your anxiety and affection for my beloved Maxi.

I also want to thank the Falkland Islands Government for all the expense incurred after the accident. This is my opportunity to thank

There is a possible option in Santiago: the Coihues Clinic, a private centre dedicated exclusively to the rehabilitation of people suffering from neurological, traumatic and rheumatoid problems.

Maxi would need to stay there for three months, but the cost per month is approximately 4 million pesos (around £4,000). The doctors have explained to Maxi's mother that his brain will need a period of two years to recover, but that little by little Maximiliano could recover his speech and other motor functions. At this time, he can only move his hands a little and answer questions with eve movements.

A trip down memory lane

Nineteen years ago. November 27, 1987

THREE weeks of frustrating international politics makes the shortest leg of an Islander aircraft's journey from the United Kingdom seem the longest. After a 12,000 mile journey from the Isle of Wight via Iceland, Canada, USA, West Indies, Panama, Ecuador and Peru, the last hop from Punta Arenas in Chile to Stanley should in normal circumstances have been easy. However, between the friendly assistance of Chile and the warm welcome of the Falklands lay Argentine pride and no-one in the Islands is surprised to learn that Chile is pressured into prohibiting the aircraft's departure. After a lengthy wait in Chile, Captain Nick Scott has his flight plan approved and arrives at Stanley Airport to the popping of champagne corks. Dale Campbell-Savours, MP for Workington visits the Islands

Dale Campbell-Savours. MP for Workington visits the Islands and ruffles feathers with his firm belief in the inevitability or advisability of a rapprochement between the Falklands and Argentina. The MP is not remembered favourably by Islanders for advocating on *Calling the Falklands* that Islanders should be offered £10,000 to settle in the United Kingdom.

The first commercial airliner since the 1982 war carrying tourists lands in the Islands. 160 friendly Canadians enthuse over the brief stopover during their whistlestop tour.

A sudden reduction of suitable crab catches force the Falklands Seafood Company to suspend its fishing activities for a month with the bright yellow crabber, *Laura J*, lying at anchor in Stanley harbour and her two crew sent home.

Nine years ago, November 28, 1997

THE future of the Argentine-British Conferences, which since the mid-1980s have sought ties between the two countries and the Falkland Islands, is being considered, and, according to a key organiser it is almost certain that there will be no more of the events. According to Alasdair Forsyth, a key member of the South Atlantic Council the conferences have served their purpose and are no longer necessary.

Ex-Ryder Cup Captain Bernard Gallacher visits the Islands accompanied by Sir Rex Hunt and encourages and coaches golfers on East and West Falklands.

In ExCo, £400.000 is approved to allow the Department of Agriculture to progress the replacement fencing scheme. Reacting to poor loligo catches this past season. ExCo also approve some proposals by the Director of Fisheries for exploratory loligo fishing throughout the year, including during the off-season.

Six years ago, November 24, 2000

The reintroduction of the medical services levy is recommended at a meeting of the Health and Medical Services Committee by the Director of Health Derek Muhl.

Seventeen runners enjoy perfect weather for the annual Lighthouse Run, a nine kilometre run from the FIGAS hangars to the Cape Pembroke Lighthouse and back. Hugh Marsden won the race with a course record of 33.42 breaking the previous record held by Mark Ellis of 34.58.

Expert advice for Pensions Board

THE Pensions Board had a two day training session last week with James Pepler, an actuary from the UK Government Actuary's Department.

The Board were getting up to speed on investment, their duties as board members and recent changes in pensions in the UK.

The Board are in charge of the Falkland Islands Pensions Scheme (FIPS). Like in the UK, the Board are ordinary people who have to look after the interests of pension scheme members. They take advice from experts like Mr Pepler before taking their decisions. The training will help them when they are making those decisions and follows on from a similar session four years ago.

Mr Pepler said having a pensions board made up of local people means that the decisions are made by the people who can best take account of the needs of Falkland Islanders. "However, they are not experts so sometimes will need help from elsewhere or will have to hire specialists to carry out some of their responsibilities like investment or administration. The training means that they understand better the advice that they get and how they can ensure that the specialists they engage are carrying out their work satisfactorily.

The FIPS investments are managed by Fidelity International but the Board have to decide on the overall investment strategy and have to monitor the performance of Fidelity on behalf of FIPS members.

The investment returns achieved by Fidelity affect the size of members' benefits so this is one of the most important areas of the board's responsibilities.

One of the topics discussed at the sessions was that people are living longer and longer. In the UK, a 65 year old man in 1981 would have lived another 14 year on average to age 79. A man who was 65 in 2004 should expect to live a further five years to age 84 and a 65 year old in 2054 is projected to live to 89. Women live longer than men on average, and their life expectancy is also increasing.

Mr Pepler commented, "It's good news that we're all living longer, as long as the extra years are healthy ones, but this means that pensions are becoming more expensive. The UK is planning to increase state pension age from 65 to 68 over the next 50 years in response to the expected increase in life expectancy."

For FIPS members the increases in life expectancy mean that over the years the amount of annual pension available from a particular size of fund will tend to get smaller because the pension is expected to be paid for longer.

FIPS looks after the pension funds of 940 people who work for the Falkland Islands Government or one of the other employers that has joined FIPS or who are private individuals who have decided to save for their pension through FIPS.

The UK Government Actuary's Department provides expert advice to public sector pension schemes in the UK and also advises UK dependant territories on their pensions. Actuaries are professionals who specialise in pensions, insurance or investment. They deal with tinancial risks.

Education staff learn of new developments

FOR the past two weeks, John Searson and Heather Ogburn have been in the Islands working with the staff of the Infant and Junior School (IJS), Camp Education and the Falkland Islands Community School (FICS).

John Searson is the Principal Education Adviser for Plymouth City Council who is responsible for all aspects of the National Curriculum from 4+ - 19. Heather Ogburn, is a senior adviser who is a specialist in literacy.

Together they have provided two training days for all staff. According to a spokesperson from the Education Department, "the approach taken was to share the latest developments in Education but in an active and fun way.

"Of significance was the explanation of the changes which have taken place in the Ofsted inspection system. "These were made clear, par-

"These were made clear, particularly the need for schools to undertake a rigorous self evaluation of their strengths and areas for developments.

It is this self evaluation which

then determines the focus of the resulting inspection."

Following the two days of training, the Education spokesperson said, "...all schools and staff have been able to benefit from bespoke advice and guidance.

"Support has been available to individual teachers, to groups of teachers where there is a common interest and at whole staff meetings where everyone is able to benefit from new perspectives and approaches to learning."

Mr Searson and Ms Ogburn returned to the UK on Saturday but have offered to continue the support consultancy via email and additionally will seek to link staff with individual UK teachers who have the same areas of responsibility, so that a forum for curriculum debate in specific areas is created.

The spokesperson said many positive comments about their two week stay have been received, "...and it is hoped that this will not be the last time they come and share their expertise with colleagues in the Falklands."

IF A Falkland Islander had three feet. they would be firmly planted equally on the backs of fisheries, farming and tourism.

Tourism is one of the fastest growing and most exciting industries in the islands, with increasing numbers of land-based tourists and cruise ship passengers visiting wildlife hotspots in camp.

The 2006/07 cruise passenger season is no exception and landowners, Sulivan Shipping, FIC and Falkland Islands Tourist Board are working together to minimise damage and disturbance at sensitive wildlife sites. "One key tool is the Visitor's Guide to the Falkland Islands because it outlines management at most visitor sites and embodies the International Association of Antarctic Tour Operators (IAATO) guidelines," said Debbie Summers, of Sulivan Shipping.

This season sees the start of a post-visit reporting scheme, which is being managed by the Environmental Planning Department in conjunction with the cruise vessels, landowners and agents. "The Falkland Islands has developed a good working relationship with IAATO and they have kindly extended their South Georgia and Antarctic reporting system to include the Falklands," explained Dominique Giudicelli, Environmental Planning Officer. "At the end of the season, IAATO will be able to provide us with an annual dataset of visitor numbers, their activities and sites visited, and any suggestions for better management."

The Environmental Committee decided to accept IAATO's offer at a recent meeting. Councillor Davies, Chair of the Environment Committee, explained: "The information will be one tool to help Falkland Islands Government and Falkland Islands Tourist Board ensure that wildlife tourism in the islands remains sustainable."

Low-impact visitation to wildlife areas requires forward planning as landowners such as Roddy and Lilly Napier on West Point Island have shown over the last 30 years. Tourism on West Point Island has grown so much over recent years that the Devil's Nose Black-browed albatross colony track was re-routed and hardened last winter to reduce damage and tussac was replanted adjacent to the colony to hide the visitors from the breeding

albatrosses. The new track was constructed with funds obtained from Falklands Conservation's Grant Scheme.

Black-browed albatrosses on West Point Island are well accustomed to visitors and the birds are unlikely to be significantly effected. Giant petrels on the other hand present a much harder problem to manage as they fly off nests when people are still hundreds of metres away. On Sea Lion Island, David and Patricia Gray had a hide constructed in the late 1980's to hide visitors from a small group of breeding giant petrels.

Combining the protection of Barren Island's 1,000 pairs of nesting giant petrels and hosting cruise ship passengers presented owners Chris and Lindsey May with some initial headaches. "Our giant petrels are very flighty and once they are disturbed off nests, in come the waiting skuas," explained Chris.

In previous seasons, Chris worked with cruise ship staff to keep passengers well back. However, this season a new system has been put in place, using a low lying rope fence to prevent visitors getting more than 200m towards the nesting birds. "The tourists can wander along the beach and up to the rope – it's a clear but unobtru-sive message," said Chris.

Helen Otley, the new Environmental Officer with the Environmental Planning Department, kept an eye on the first cruise vessel landing on Barren Island on November The rope fence works well and I liked the fact that the rope was salvaged by Chris from the Elqui, which was caught pirate fishing in South Georgia in 2005 and subse-quently scuttled."

Despite Chris's attention to the management of giant petrels on Barren Island, they are not the only drawcard for visitors. "Over 35 bird species have been seen on Barren Island, including endemics such as Cobb's wren and Aightless steamer ducks, and actually, it's our colony of hauled out sea lions that wows most people," explained Chris.

Staff from the Environmental Planning Department will be making observations of cruise vessels landings at other sites around the Falkland Islands through this summer to discover how other landowners, expedition staff and agents ensure tourism remains sustainable.



BSES kicks off five year project

THE British Schools Exploring Society (BSES) aims to "provide young people with an intense and lasting experience of self-discovery in a demanding and natural wilderness environment," and are recruiting for a project which will span five years

span five years In 2007 BSES Expeditions celebrates its 75th Anniversary and to mark this event will commence their Beyond Endurance Expedition. This coincides with the International Polar Year which will raise awareness of polar science and environmental issues.

The British Schools Exploring Society returned to Stanley on October 28 to carry out a reconnaissance expedition for Beyond Endurance. They are developing a five year programme for young explorers to undertake scientific exploration and adventurous activities in the South Atlantic. Over this five year span, the project will run annually for three months during the austral summer. They hope to recruit participants from the Falklands. Norway, New Zealand and the UK to create a 25 strong team.

The proposed trip would comprise three distinct phases: The Falkland Islands. The Antarctic Peninsula and South Georgia

This current reconnaissance follows on from the Footsteps of Shackleton Expedition in 2003/4 and that of the BSES members trip in 2005 led by the late David Nicholls.

The team is made up of eight BSES members including scientists, medics, mountaineers and logistics staff. They are creating a trip which will provide a rich experience for budding scientists in a challenging polar environment.

During their three week stay in the Falklands in 2003. BSES undertook several field projects with the guidance of Falklands Conservation. These studies included surveying the flora and shag colonies on Bleaker Island, where they also planted tussock as part of the island regeneration process. At Volunteer Point. BSES carried out a beach-long survey of Magellanic penguins.

As part of their proposed annual Falklands phase over the next five years BSES are hoping to continue with their work in association with Falklands Conservation. With plans to participate in further bird and plant surveys on some of the outlying islands, BSES are keen to contribute to the protection of our delicate ecosystem.

Following their time here, the expedition will continue down to the Antarctic Peninsula and on to South Georgia with the support of HMS Endurance. Starting in Deception Island in the South Shetlands, scientific projects will include investigations in volcanology, meteorology and ecology. Further south around Paradise Harbour and Brabant Island mountaineering and glaciology studies will be combined.

On South Georgia the expedition will be based in Husvik, near one of the abandoned whaling stations where the South Georgia Herttage Trust have recently restored the managers villa. In collaboration, BSES are planning a diverse programme of field science and restoration in the area.

A spokesperson for the group said, "Data collected over the five year time frame should help our understanding of the unique natural sub-Antarctic environment.

"Adventuring into the glaciated interior of the Island will provide a rare opportunity for young people." Our thanks to Vanessa O'Brien

As we walked into the 4 Season Mess for lunch, it felt like the whole world was looking at us - so embarrassing! For my lunch I had hot dog with onion and beans, there was a massive choice, but Julian said we only had about 20 minutes so we had to choose quickly.

Straight after lunch we made a hasty exit and were lead off to the Air Field Fire Section for a quick look around the fire engines. We were shown around all the equipment and where it was situated on the engines. Karen was lucky enough to even try on a breathing apperatus system; we also had a play with the sirens.

The air field fire section then took a fire engine out to show us how fast it could go (they can get up to \$0mph when they are about 20 tonnes) and they sprayed a lot of water to demonstrate what would happen if a plane came down that was on fire.

General Practice by Johan Wilkinson, KEMH Pathology Department MRSA: reducing the risk of infections in hospital

WHAT is MRSA? MRSA is the name given to a group of bacteria that belong to the Staphylococcus aureus (SA) family of bacteria.

Most Staphylococcus aureus bacteria can be treated with antibiotics like methicillin. However, certain types of Staphylococcus aureus bacteria cannot be treated with methicillin the bacteria are resistant to these drugs. These are called Methicillin (M) Resistent (R) Staphylococcus (S) aureus (A). How did MRSA become re-

sistant to Methicillin? Whenever bacteria encounter an antibiotic (such as methicillin) some of the bacteria may be able to survive it. The surviving, methicillin-resistant bacteria can then multiply, potentially producing bacteria with even better resistance. The chances of resistant bacteria developing have been increased by

· failure to finish full courses of antibiotics, allowing bacteria with some resistance to survive and multiply

overuse of antibiotics, meaning that bacteria encounter and survive a wide range of antibiotics

How common is Staphylococcus aureus?

It's estimated that one in three healthy people carry Staphyloccocus aureus bacteria on their skin, in their noses or in the back of their throats.

Few UK studies have looked at how many healthy people who are not in hospital carry MRSA - one study estimates about one in 100 people. This is about the same as US estimates.

People carrying the bacteria are said to be colonised, but not infected: the bacteria are simply "hitching a lift" on the surface of the body and have not entered their bodies

Will carrying Staphylococcus aureus harm me?

While the bacteria are simply being carried on the surface of the skin, all Staphylococcus aureus, including the MRSA strain, are not harmful to a healthy person. Because of this, most people are never aware that they are carrying the bacteria.

How does Staphylococcus aureus cause an infection?

Infection happens if the bacteria enter the body through a cut, a graze or any break in the skin - either accidental or deliberate (eg surgical cut).

The bacteria can then cause skin infections or other more severe infections inside the body. The severity of the infection depends on where in the body the bacteria has spread to.

What types of infection can the family of *Staphylococcus aureus* (which includes MRSA) cause?

If the infection is just under the skin, SA can cause pimples or boils. The affected areas may be swollen, painful and red.

If bacteria get into a person's blood stream, usually through a deep wound, they can spread throughout the body and cause other infections. For example: wound infections, abscesses, pneumonia (lung infection), septicaemia (blood poisoning), osteomyelitis (bone infection), septic arthritis (joint infection), heart valve infections or urinary tract infections. Implanted devices, such as hip or knee replacements, can also become infected.

Who is most at risk of developing an MRSA infection?

The people who are most at risk of becoming either colonised or in-fected with MRSA are those in close contact with people who may be carrying the bacteria, for example in hospital wards that care for ill people

MRSA infection is most likely to develop in people who:

· have weakened immune systems, for example the elderly, premature or newborn babies, or pcople who already have another infection

 have open wounds, burns or cuts, for example people who have undergone surgery or who have other types of wounds

Are MRSA infections more dangerous than other infections?

They can be. Many skin-deep infections, such as boils, clear up without the need for antibiotics once the pus has been drained away. Don't try this yourself: boils should only be drained by a health professional.

But people in whom MRSA infection has spread further usually need treatments such as antibiotics or surgery

Normal Staphylococcus aureus infections are treated with methicillin-type antibiotics. But MRSA infections cannot be treated with the usual antibiotics - so longer treatment or newer antibiotics need to be used. This can mean that the bacteria have more time to multiply and spread through the body -

resulting in more severe infection. Can MRSA infections be treated?

Yes, MRSA can be treated. The resistance of the MRSA bacteria to certain types of antibiotics makes treatment more difficult, but not impossible. Most strains of MRSA can be treated with the antibiotics vancomycin and teicoplanin, which are given by injection or through an intravenous drip.

Surgery may also be needed to remove infected tissue or implanted devices.

How is MRSA spread?

A person can become colonised with MRSA (or infected if the bacteria enters the body) by:

· skin contact with a person carrying MRSA on their skin

contact with surfaces and objects that have been touched or used by someone carrying MRSA, such as door handles, razors, towels and

sheets · contact with dust that contains skin particles carrying MRSA

By touching an open wound or scratching damaged skin, people who are colonised by MRSA can transfer the bacteria from their hands into their body, leading to

infection. How can we prevent the spread of MRSA and other infections in hospitals?

In hospitals a number of measures have been put in place to reduce the spread of infections:

· health care professionals wash their hands or use alcohol-based hand rubs between patients to avoid transferring bacteria from one pa-tient to the next

· hospital wards, corridors and surfaces are regularly cleaned

· skin wounds are covered with dressings

· patients are asked not to touch their wounds or damaged skin and to regularly wash their hands to prevent self infection

· people visiting patients with MRSA infections may be asked to wash their hands before and after visiting

· people who develop an MRSA infection are normally cared for in an isolation room to help prevent the bacteria being easily transferred to others

Because many patients of the KEMH visit UK hospitals it is important that they are screened for MRSA on their return. This is sometimes difficult to monitor because people may be an out-patient in the UK and not always be admitted to the KEMH when they get back.

Will clean hospital wards and corridors make MRSA go away?

No. because MRSA is carried by people. Mopping floors and wiping surfaces will never get rid of all the bacteria, so rigorous basic hygiene measures are still needed. But by keeping down the amount of MRSA-containing dust and keeping surfaces free of MRSA there will be fewer opportunities for it to infect a vulnerable person.

How can I reduce my risk of developing an MRSA infection? NHS Direct suggests that when you are staying in hospital, you should:

 keep your hands and body clean take soap, a flannel, moist handwipes and your own razor into hospital with you

· not touch any damaged skin or surgical wounds that you have

· always wash your hands after using the toilet or commode

· always wash your hands or clean them with a hand-wipe immediately before and after eating a meal

· make sure that your bed area is cleaned regularly

· report any unclean toilet or bathroom facilities

 make sure your visitors have washed their hands

· don't encourage people to sit on your bed

If you are concerned about hygiene, you should not be afraid to ask your doctor or nurse if they have washed their hands before they touch you.

In day-to-day life, you can avoid MRSA skin infections by

keeping your hands clean by washing them thoroughly

· keeping cuts and scrapes clean and covered with a plaster or dressing

· avoiding touching other people's wounds or dressings

 avoiding sharing personal items such as towels or razors

Baked Toothfish with Basil Pesto Crust (By Krysteen Ormond)

The fish

Ikg Toothfish, filleted and boned 4-5tbisp Pesto Verde 1/2lb-ish Breadcrumbs (*preferably from The Bread Shop*) Olive Oil

Shredded basil leaves/ltsp dried basil

The salad

Mixed leaves

5tblsp pesto rosso

5tblsp soft goat's cheese Olive oil

2tblsp tepid water

Line a baking sheet with tinfoil and lightly oil; lay the fillets on top. Combine the breadcrumbs and green pesto with enough oil to hold the mix together, but so that it still crumbles to the touch, roughly the same consistency as crumble topping. Add the basil and roughly pat across the top of the toothfish.

Bake in a preheated oven at 180C until the crust is golden and the fish flakes easily.


Whilst the fish is baking, mix together the red pesto, cheese and a good glug of olive oil. Place the bowl over a pan of boiled water and slowly warm until everything starts to melt. Remove from the heat and stir (at this point, it will not come together, and separates, similar to the way egg curdles in cake batter) Cool the mixture for a few dressing. Add more oil if necessary until the dressing is smooth enough to pour or flick over the salad.

Remove the baked fish from the oven and serve with the salad and goat's cheese dressing, with a wedge of lime.

Wool report - week ending November 17 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices increased markedly at sales in South Africa and Australia last week for fleece wool lots finer than 26 micron.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" price increases were quite extreme for lots finer than approximately 24 micron and modest for lots of between 25 and 26 microns. Prices generally remained static for fleece wool lots broader than 26 micron.

For fleece wool lots of between 18 and 25 micron, price increases experienced during the week generally restored prices to levels achieved two weeks ago and as a result removed the effect of last weeks losses.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up 12 pence per kilogram at 343.1 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 331.3 pence per kilogram clean.

Price increases occurred mainly during the first two days of trading in Australia with the third and final day being a day of limited price change.

Last weeks wool markets are suggested by some analysts as having been a key "litmus" test on the strength of the prevailing new wool price regime. In the seasons biggest wool offering to date, with over 100,000 bales on offer, competition was both strong and diverse.

Farmers are urged to review the

relativity of current wool markets to last year's prices. As shown in the attached table, wool prices can be separated into two distinct sections; the first being the fine/medium market for fleece wool lots of fibre diameter of 24 micron or less. This section of the market has witnessed strong demand and as a result prices have been pushed well above those experienced last year. This contrasts to softer demand for fleece wool lots broader than 24 micron and as a result, prices for such lots remain below last years levels.

The clear segregation of demand in the current wool market has a high probability of impacting on farm returns for Falkland Islands farmers. Farms with much of their clip above 25 micron are not reeommended to budget on increased wool returns based on current wool market conditions, while those which much of their clip below 25 micron are able to at least begin planning on potentially improved wool income for the season.

In Australia 91% of the 76,765 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 9,857 bales of crossbred wool of which 85% was sold.

Sales continue next week in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia with a combined offering of almost 100,000 bales.

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AG: 'Offences couldn't be ignored'

THE Attorney General has defended the decision to bring criminal prosecutions against two police officers saying the nature of the alleged offences meant they could not be ignored or handled, "...in anything other than the most serious way."

Responding to a number of issues raised by *Penguin News* Managing Editor Jenny Cockwell in her editorial column last week, Melanie Chilton revealed much of the background to the prosecutions of the Chief of Police, Superintendent David Morris, and former Detective Sergeant Jonathan Butler.

Addressing how the criminal prosecutions of Mr Morris and Mr Butler were deemed to be in the public's interest, Mrs Chilton said that following a "thorough and independent" investigation by the Metropolitan Police Service who had been commissioned for the purpose by the former Governor, the then Attorney General (Mr David Lang QC), instructed Mr John Kelsey-Fry, Queen's Counsel, to prepare a written opinion for his consideration. "Mr Kelsey-Fry is a vastly experienced and eminent criminal barrister," Mrs Chilton said, "recommended by the Crown Prosecution Service of England."

He advised "in the clearest terms" that, not only was there sufficient evidence to prosecute, but that the prosecutions were in the public interest, an opinion the Attorney General concurred with "after careful deliberation".

Mrs Chilton said Mr Kelsey-Fry concluded without reservation that the prosecutions were in the public interest having regard to the serious nature of the charges against police officers of some seniority. "The decision as to whether to prosecute any alleged criminal offence is for the Attorney General alone to make."

In her editorial, Mrs Cockwell asked why Mr Morris and Mr Butler were prosecuted before the criminal courts instead of disciplined. These were serious allegations, Mrs Chilton said. "Police officers are in a position of trust. The nature of the alleged offences could not be ignored or handled in anything other than the most serious way.

"Criminal allegations such as these should be dealt with by the criminal courts rather than by disciplinary proceedings, unless it is not in the public interest to prosecute. Where a person is charged with a criminal offence that person has enforceable rights enshrined within the Constitution, which are encompassed within a defendant's right to be 'afforded a fair hearing within a reasonable time by an independent and impartial court of law'.

"Such hearings are transparently held in open court, in the presence of the public and press, and in accordance with the due process of the law, with avenues of appeal, and access to legal aid in appropriate circumstances. Further, a person can only be found guilty if the Judge is satisfied that the defendant is guilty beyond all reasonable doubt."

Disciplinary proceedings are of a different nature, she said. "A disciplinary charge against Mr Butler would have been dealt with in accordance with the Police Ordinance 2000, and heard by a Presiding Officer appointed by the Governor. The Presiding Officer determines what the procedure at the hearing should be."

These proceedings are held in private and members of the public and the press cannot attend. Mrs Chilton continued, "Although a police officer may be legally represented where sanctions such as dismissal or reduction in rank may result, there is no legal atd. The burden of proof under the Ordinance is a lower one, in that a disciplinary charge may be proved 'on a balance of probabilities'.

"Following the hearing of evidence the Presiding Officer decides whether the charge is proved, and then submits a record of the hearing to the Governor, who decides whether or not to accept or reject the Presiding Officer's findings and determines any sanction." In the case of Mr Morris, being

In the case of Mr Morris, being the Chief Police Officer, the Police Ordinance provides that any disciplinary proceedings should be dealt with under the Management Code with any hearings held in private.

A legal practitioner may represent at a hearing, but no legal aid is available. Such a hearing takes place before the Chief Executive or a Chairperson appointed by him, a legal officer and the Director of Human Resources. The Presiding Officer makes a report of his findings to the Chief Executive, who makes recommendations to the Governor as to any sanction.

"At no time did the defendants make any representations to the prosecution that they should be dealt with by disciplinary instead of criminal proceedings," Mrs Chilton said. More on page 2.

Vandalism spree lands man in jail

A TWENTY-one year old man has been jailed for three months after he embarked on a spree of vandalism in June last year, causing more than £11,000 worth of damage.

Andrew James MacDonald was sentenced in the Senior Magistrate's Court on Wednesday after pleading guilty to three charges of criminal damage, four of vehicle interference, three of theft and taking a vehicle without consent.

Crown Prosecutor Ros Cheek said that Mr MacDonald had provided additional information to the police by interview in November and had admitted taking Kathleen Dobbyns' Land Rover, a charge he had formerly denied, driving it to the Canache and smashing it into a ditch. He also asked that another offence be taken into consideration when sentencing, admitting that he had caused damage to a Subaru Justy belonging to Melvyn Clifton.

I RECEIVED a unexpected call this week from a woman in the UK whose husband is applying for a job in the Falklands. She was keen to "get a feel for what the place is really like," something she said she couldn't gauge from any websites or literature the government might recommend.

In addition to the normal questions about a cinema and what people do in their spare time, she was particularly interested in facilities for children. While I felt a slight sense of dread when she initially enquired about this, I was pleased to find I could reel off a stack of things on offer for the kids, particularly the pre-teens.

Nick Barrett and his team at the Infant and Junior School (and I include the parent's association in this) should be congratulated for the incredible effort they have put into increasing the range of activities available to the kids

On top of the usual community groups (such as the Brownies, Guides, and Sea Cadets), after school and weekend clubs now offer an assortment of activities from karate and short tennis to ballet and pottery, along with a number of musical groups.

Feeling the senior students might be a bit hard done by, compared to the younger pupils, I called the Community School to ask what they have available and, again, was pleasantly surprised.

In addition to a number of sports and music clubs and community groups, they have an astronomy club, art and design tutorials and cookery club, with a technology club due to start soon.

How lucky these children are to be able to try their hand at new skills in a fun environment; their parents, who (if they were educated in the Falk-lands) had no such activities on offer, will be feeling a little envious.

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Busy Falklands visit for *Endurance*

THE company of HMS Endurance have spent an enjoyable few days in Stanley and around the Islands. The ship's arrival in Port

William marked a busy time which included a presentation to students at the Community School, a cocktail party for invited guests and a performance by the ship's band. The Growlers, in the Globe Tavern on Saturday night.

Captain Nick Lambert said the crew had been working long days in Antarctica before they headed here and had looked forward to their break in the Falklands.

The ship sailed from Port William on Saturday; Governor Alan Huckle was collected by one of Endurance's helicopters on Sunday morning and flown to the ship for a trip to some of the settle-ments on West Falklands and the surrounding Islands.

During their time west, Captain Lambert said, the crew were plan-ning to look for the wreck of the *Coventry*, to accurately log her po-sition on their Global Positioning System (GPS).

This is a longer than usual South Atlantic tour for the ship, nine months instead of her usual six

Captain Lambert said this will be a Captain Lambert said this will be a trial to maximise the ship's time in the ice during the austral summer and also means the ship will be able to do more work "on the diplo-macy front." Endurance is off to South Geor-

gia next week to embark on work focused on the breeding season of fur seals including an aerial count. They will also survey King Haakon Bay and carry out accurate positioning of South Georgia by GPS

Alter spending Christmas in Rio de Janeiro, they will head south to Antarctica again, including South Georgia and South Orkneys, then down to Signy for the shutting down of the BAS base there. Captain Lambert said Endur-

ance tries to come to the Islands as often as possible, "...because we know the relationship with the Falk-lands is important." However, he added, "if we're in the Falkland Islands all the time, we're not repre-senting the Navy elsewhere. We visit Chile, Argentina, Brazil and South Africa as a visible presence of the UK Government.

Continued from front She added that the Management Code provides that criminal proceedings must take precedence. "This means that any disciplinary action under the Code must be suspended in the event of a criminal investigation

As stated, the investigation and the independent advice re-ceived by the Attorney General was clear that the allegations should be prosecuted through the court.

Mrs Chilton outlined the costs so far of the investigation and pros-ecution. "The cost of the Metropolitan Police investigation was £98,000. The cost of the prosecution has yet to be finalised, as Mr Morris is awaiting sentence. However, it is estimated that prosecution costs will be in the region of £59,000.

"The prosecution does not have an estimate of the court or defendants' costs.

In her Penguin News editorial, Mrs Cockwell asked why the Metropolitan Police were asked to con-duct the investigation. Mrs Chilton explained that when the original complaint statement was taken by the Ministry of Defence Police from Mount Pleasant, a copy was

sent by the Acting Governor to the FCO Overseas Territories Department Law Enforcement Advisor, Mr Larry Covington OBE, "an experienced former police officer"

Mr Covington recommended to the Acting Governor and the FCO that an independent investigation be undertaken, and that he liaise with the Metropolitan Police Service's Directorate of Professional Standards to produce written terms of reference. Mrs Chilton ex-plained, "The Directorate, which deals with allegations of criminal and disciplinary misconduct against police officers on a day to day ba-sis, was able to deploy at short no-tice a team of seven independent and impartial officers highly experienced in such matters.

"The team was led by a Detec-tive Chief Superintendent since of-ficers should be interviewed by an officer of at least their own rank."

In the circumstances, she said, the alleged offences could not be investigated by anyone else in the Falkland Islands

Surveillance of stranded Holberg continues

AERIAL surveillance has this week shown little change in the condition of the trawler Holberg, stranded in Port Purvis.

The Director of Fisheries, Mr John Barton said there appears to be a small but continuing leak of marine gas oil. "This is breaking up/evaporating within a relatively short distance of the vessel. This is particularly the case with high wind conditions.

In terms of removing the oil, Mr Barton said the latest plan is that the owners will despatch another of their vessels to undertake this task. "The vessel should sail at the end of this week. It will have equipment and personnel onboard for salvaging the oil. It will also carry booms and skimmers to deal with any leaks which may occur during the operation.

In other fisheries news, Mr Barton said applications for illex squid licences are up on last year with 77 so far received. He com-mented, "If all these convert into licences, then the numbers will be up on 2006. This number of licences would also ensure that the budget estimate for licence revenue is achieved."

The number of applications is still lower than some of the previous peak years. The next *Illex* season is due to

start on February 15, 2007 in Falk-land Islands zones. Mr Barton com-mented, "We will, hopefully, get some more information on how the Illex season is shaping up before then, and in particular, should get some reports of high seas activitv.

Vandalism spree lands man in jail

Continued from front page. Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said that Crown Counsel (A) Alison Inglis, acting for the defendant, had put forward a strong plea in mitigation, drawing out every possible point in his favour but, the fact remained that he had committed a "series of serious offences."

Mrs Faulds gave Mr MacDonald credit for making a further statement to the police and making a "clean breast of it at last."

She said there was no evidence that he deliberately targeted Neil McKay's property, although it was he who suffered most from Mr MacDonalds actions.

Addressing Mr MacDonald, Mrs Faulds said, "You were convicted of offences on June 16 2005 and ordered to serve 100 hours community service but just over a month later you went on to commit the offences for which you are now to be sentenced. You were given a chance in June 2005 but you wasted it and then went on to deny your offences for over a year after that."

She said that a custodial sentence is the only appropriate penalty despite his youth and his eventual admissions.

Mrs Faulds said she would have liked to impose a compensation order so that he could make some sort of redress to the people whose property has been damaged or stolen, adding, "... but your financial circumstances are such that it is simply not practicable."

Mr MacDonald was sentenced to three months imprisonment for the offences to Neil McKay's vehicles, one month for the offence relating to Kathy Dobbyns' Land Rover and seven days imprisonment for each of the other offences, all to run concurrently. Mr MacDonald was also ordered to pay £100 "as a small contribution towards the very considerable prosecution costs."

No new boss found for Tourist Board


THE recruitment process for a new General Manager of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board (FITB) has ended without anyone being appointed.

Cable and Wireless restructure means more 'locally-based decisions'

THE restructuring of Cable and Wireless, which has lead to the launch of a new company, will not interrupt the service to customers, two senior representatives have assured.

The new company - Cable and Wire-less South Atlantic Limited - is officially incorporated today.

Aaron Richardson, the new Chief Executive of Cable and Wireless South Atlantic Ltd, and Adam Dunlop, Devel-opment Director of Cable and Wireless International's Monaco and Islands division say the incorporation of the new company is an exciting development, .. because it confirms what we think of the Falkland Islands - we are putting our future here.

The new company will mean in-creased local decision-making power, Mr Dunlop said. "The businesses (in the Falklands, Saint Helena and Ascension) won't be caught up in 'plc', it will en-able them to be more flexible, take decisions in a quicker way and to respond to customer needs... it's good for everyone

In October, employees of Cable and Wireless in the Falklands were rocked by news of redundancies within the company; whether or not more are likely to follow, Mr Dunlop did not know. He commented, "The decisions to make people redundant are not taken lightly. I don't want to comment on specifics, but we take it very seriously; there are no

firm plans at the moment... "What we are trying to do is put the businesses on the most sustainable footing possible and to make sure we have the work force that is capable of growing the businesses and of providing the customers with the expertise that they need.

He continued, "We're not immune to changes in trends in the telecoms sector around the world, no one is - if you Google France Telecom, BT, Vodatione, there will be massive redundancy stories everywhere. If you go to Cable and Wireless UK you'll see we're reducing our workforce from five thousand to two and a half thousand.

"No one is immune to this but we are going to limit it as much as we can.' The new manager

Aaron Richardson has been brought in to manage the South Atlantic company. He hopes to be in the Falklands for "considerably longer than two years", saying "the days of rolling expatriates coming through the business centre are behind us."

His background is not in telecommunications but in "issues of corporate restructuring and change management." He specialises in the "efficiencies of business units in various fast moving environments," and says the South Atlantic company is the perfect case in point.

Mr Richardson and his colleague were both keen to stress the restructure will not lead to any interruption of service. So what will the implications of the change be?

Mr Dunlop commented, "In the short term we're going to be working on increasing our customer focus to make sure we're meeting their needs as far as we can." For example, he said, the company has this week increased its broadband capacity to the Islands, effectively doubling the satellite capacity

We are also looking at refining the mobile offer, readdressing the residential broadband packages, we're working on inbound and outbound roaming, and we're trying to iron out technical issues we've got with international SMS (texting), which we hope to have for Christmas."

The review of residential broadband packages could be at the cost of larger businesses, Mr Richardson said. "We

are planning to protect the residential user which means we will have a pricing point which will be accessible and competitive. We are then going to be looking at other packages which we supply in the Islands, for either faster broadband speeds or larger capacities...

This will mean a "complete repackaging of everything," Mr Richardson said. "The costs need to be allocated elsewhere in our business model. We are looking at allowing smaller businesses to work on residential lines.

However, he added, "If we're ring fencing the residential and allowing people who are businesses to be classed as residential, we need to spread that increasing cost among a not-increasing cus-tomer base."

A number of options for the future of telecoms in Camp have been presented to the government; these options, Mr Richardson said, range from, "...a basic replacement of the existing telephone system," to "complete packages involving telephone, broadband, the possibility of mobile phones, digital television, digital radio.

However, the matter comes down to government policy, he said. "Obviously we support Camp services fully, but there is a fundamental political decision in the hands of the government and the councillors

Falklands challenges

Mr Dunlop is keen for Cable and Wireless customers in the Falklands to understand the challenges of providing modern telecoms services here. "I think the Falklands is the smallest market in the world with a mobile and broadband network which is something we're very proud of."

However, it's an expensive business. "There are limited economies of scale, a limited customer base, so it's hard to get the return on your investment. We've got to help people understand the challenge of remoteness which means everything has to go on satellite and that has a cost attached to it. "People look to the UK and expect a

similar level of service but it's not reasonable - we'll get as close as we can within the constraints we're working under..

Some individuals in the Islands have begun to 'self-supply' telephony infra-structure to bypass the Cable and Wireless network. This small market can only support one single exclusive operator, Mr Dunlop said, and he urged these people to think again.

He commented, "This is a difficult issue for us to face but I think we have to. There is a legal argument to it that

Chilean 'Lenga' businessmen seek Falklands trade

A GROUP of Punta Arenas businessmen visited the Islands last week.

The trade delegation, led by Mr Marcos Leal Pineda, regional director of the Chilean Ministry of Foreign Ministry's 'ProChile' have been meeting with Falklands businesses and retailers hoping to establish links with the Islands.

The delegation were representing an association of furniture and construction entrepreneurs who use Lenga wood which is only found in the forests of Patagonia - for their products. Mr Leal Pineda said they were keen to understand the possible market in the Falk-lands. They want to, "...see the culture of the Falklands and see what people want and need. We know you buy things by catalogue and, as a result, are patient, but we also know you pay a lot for what you get." The association of entrepreneurs of-

fer an array of Lenga products, from bedroom to living room furniture, and windows to coffins.

Mr Leal Pineda commented,

"Within the members the products on offer include beds, chairs, sofas, wine racks, tables, windows and doors.

In the past, he said, separate busi-nesses were almost hidden in Punta Arenas; by joining forces under the association, they are able to better promote them-selves. "When we're together, we're stronger."

he association plans to establish a web site through which Falkland Islanders could place orders in English, something Mr Leat Pineda said will take time. However, he added that the group is confident there is a potential market in the Falklands and this is a valuable tool to work on; this visit, he said, "is just the genesis."

Next year, all the members of the association will be selling their goods at a trade fair, planned to be held in Punta Arenas from July 26 - 30. Mr Leal Pineda said an invitation to Falkland Islands businesses will be sent out but added, 'Anyone who says they are from the Falklands will be given free entry.

Cable and Wireless has an exclusive licence awarded by the government who is responsible for the regulation of the market.

"More importantly, there is a more general economic aspect to it. The market is of limited size with limited revenues. If you reduce that market by people self-supplying, you are reducing any opportunity for the single operator to provide services to the whole community at an affordable price.

"If you alter the market size, that reduces our ability to invest further and to provide services to everybody at an affordable, reasonable price.

Mr Richardson said Cable and Wireless can provide these "bypass solutions" in the Falklands, "...and there's no fundamental reason why anyone should be wanting to run their own systems.

Shouldn't the fact people are looking to provide their own infrastructure be a sign to Cable and Wireless that customers are not happy with what they provide? Mr Richardson does not agree. "I don't know why people are doing it, there is an alternative we can provide which is as good if not better and it supports the other things we are trying to do, for the benefit of the whole community.

He said the government has been consulted on this and added, "...we expect action to be taken imminently."

Some people have become concerned that, in trying to protect its revenue base, Cable and Wireless will make efforts to block Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP) such as Skype, however Mr Richardson assured no such move will be made.

He commented, "Everything on this island goes through a satellite. Satellite space is very expensive and very restricted so acts as a bottle neck. Real time com-munications, such as VOIP and especially web cam, attempt to send information at exactly the same rate that it receives information, which uses massive capacity. The effect of that is that if several people are using it at the same time, you've just used up the majority of the bandwidth.

'l can categorically say that Cable and Wireless do not block Skype on this island. We prioritise people sending email and surfing the net so what people will notice at heavy usage times is that things such as Skype will not be as efficient as maybe they want just because of the demand on the bottleneck of the service

"That is the situation we're in now and it's the same situation as anyone else in the world who tries to do everything through a satellite."

Environmental Planning Officer: 'the Falklands is heading the right way'

ENVIRONMENTAL Planning Officer Dominique Giudicelli completes her 26 month contract in the Falklands in the New Year.

Her successor is expected to be appointed shortly and should be arriving in February.

As the job title indicates, Dominique's role has involved two definite aspects - planning and the environment.

With regard to the former, she feels the Planning and Building Committee is much more streamlined than when she arrived two years ago. Dominique explained, "Doing away with things like Temporary Planning Permission was a good move. It's supposed to be there for testing a development to see if it is acceptable or not. I inherited a lot that had been going on for over five years so a concerted effort was made to get rid of them or make things permanent. That's had quite an impact on the case work of the planning committee, possibly up to a quarter of cases presented to the committee have dropped."

Involving people more in the development process has been an important focus for Dominique This means contacting neighbours of planning applicants to ensure they understand what is proposed and to see how they feel about developments. She is always happy to talk to anybody about any development issue. One of the biggest measures of greater public interest in planning, she said, was that nine people applied for the vacancy for a lay person on the Planning and Building Committee: "In such a small community, that's enormous.

Dominique has been involved in the planning for the historic dockyard site and she feels some sadness that she won't be here to see the project through. She said people seem to be more aware of the need to provide infrastructure for visitors and aware of the value of the historic parts of central Stanley -"whilst the Public Works Department has helped to maintain the buildings, the dockyard could become a totally different place. The

buildings help to create some spaces which are sheltered from the worst of the weather and if new uses and good... the resurfacing of the paths through the area happened, it could be a great place to visit. It could become an

integral part of Stanley instead of a place few people have seen. Looking after historic buildings is something she feels passionately about and in the future she would like to see central Stanley treated as a conservation area, "and give people incentives to look after what they have." Dominique describes Stanley as, "one of the prettiest towns 1 know". She is passionate about the care of its architectural and other heritage. "If you walk along Ross Road, now that the containers near the Boathouse have been removed, the PWD has been painted and the Education Department and Stanley House picket fences have been painted, you can

see how pretty it is with a bit of The environment

The environmental aspects of her work have clearly been reward-ing for Dominique. She is pleased the Falklands is now a signatory to the Kyoto Protocol, not because we have a problem with emissions but because, "...on a global scale, the Falklands is going to look super

While she does not believe the Islands can do much to prevent climate change, she welcomed the moves being taken to be more environmentally friendly. "One of the main motivators for me was the knowledge the government is going to implement a couple of schemes that will have a tremendous impact on fossil fuel consumption in the Falklands: the wind farm, which should displace at least 20% of fossil fuel consumption and the waste heat recovery project. I really support these projects.

The feedback of naturalists such as Ian Strange, Sally Poncet and most of the Environmental Committee members, has been invaluable to her work, Dominique says. "lan, for example, invited me early on to visit New Island. He was a real source of inspiration in terms of understanding all the different connections between the different parts of the environment in the Falklands and understanding how Falkland Islanders have a really important role to play in this."

As for the Islands' environmental future, Dominique feels there is room for improvement on our understanding of the marine environ-

ment. "There are 750-plus islands and the coastal strip is enormous; there is an interdependence between the coastal and marine environment. Most of the biodiversity tends to be along the coast and yet we know so little about the marine environment. There is a gap in that knowledge." Things are looking promising, she said, with the recent appointment of the government's first officer dealing entirely with environmental matters, Helen Otley

Dominique would like to see more help given to landowners to improve biodiversity and in turn encourage more visitors and does not feel we face big problems in re-lation to human impact: "The sewer is going to end up going into the open sea eventually. PWD are looking at waste minimisation ... it's all going the right way." At the end of her contract, af-

ter travelling for a couple of months in South America with her husband Mike and son Pierre, Dominique will be heading to Brighton to be re-united with her eldest son, Tristan who is studying with his friends from Stanley at Chichester College. However she has a number of projects planned, including possible work with the French on albatross and petrel conservation along with Tristan da Cunha, South Georgia and the Falklands, under the ACAP agreement.

She also hopes to travel to St Helena to carry out voluntary work on the conservation of historic buildings and places, "...to see if I can be of any help in getting information for an eventual World Heritage Status for Jamestown.

She says she will miss the Falk-lands dearly: "I'll miss walking to work in the morning and smelling that amazingly clean air. I will very much miss the enriching friendships I've made here. I've never been to a place like this where I've made such meaningful friendships in so little time.

"I love this unspoilt, remote place. Going back to the South East of England is going to be one hell of a shock!"

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The story of the Falkand Islands Company from 1851 to date



A NEW booklet now gracing the shelves of the Capstan Gift Shop tells the history of the Falkland Islands Company from 1851.

Containing some great pictures both up to date and historic, the booklet by Michael Wright contains little gems of information that will interest everyone.

Formed in 1851 when the British Empire was at the height of its power and glory, by 1951 the Falkland Islands Company owned almost half the land area of the Islands and the sheep that grazed it. It employed a quarter of the work force, played a dominant role in the economy and was an ever present influence in the life of the community who referred to it quite simply as 'The Company.'

In 1976 an economic survey (The Shackleton Report) was un-

dertaken by Lord Shackleton and a team of experts setting out the "state of stagnation and degeneration in the Islands. Published in 1977, it concluded that, amonst other things, ownership of farms should be widened to create more opportunites for Islanders to have a stake in the Falklands.

The 1982 war with Argentina brought a new urgency for the implementation of the report and although the company's response to the report was a robust one, claiming that the report's findings were based on inaccurate statistical data, the company gradually divested itself of its farms while seeking other commercial opportunities identified in the report.

The new 45 page booklet covers the pre-colonial years, the formation of the Falkland Islands Company, the companies activities (including shipping) the 1982 conflict and all aspects of involvement with life and business in the Falklands.

The history of former managers with familar names such as Lafone, Cobb and Dean is covered in brief but informative chapters.

The section on the company's ships which includes pictures of the Lafonia, Fuzzoy and the Darwin will be a hit with many who will remember these vital links with the outside world and the Camp with great fondness. The Darwin was a popular vessel with Islanders but proved too large and expensive to run and was sold in 1972 - some years later she was hunted for suspected smuggling operations in the Caribbean and was scuttled by her crew.

The methods of overland transport through the years is also recorded. Did you know that the company owned 1,284 horses in



1952? - now they are mostly replaced with motorbikes and quads.


Getting bogged, an inevitable occurence before the days of roads (or all-weather tracks), is summed up beautifully in the booklet by former Chief Executive Andrew Gurr, recalling his driving experiences in the late 1990s: "Getting bogged is tremendous fun in retrospect. It produces more stories about the community than golf or fishing. The locals tend to take it in their stride dismissing the lifethreatening challenges as being no more than commonplace. I suspect it is character building. It will be very sorely missed when all the Islands are served by road."



Argentines look at Gib agreement

ARGENTINA is studying the Cordoba agreement reached between Gibraltar. Spain and Britain to see if it has any implications for its own longstanding dispute with the United Kingdom over the Falklands.

This emerged in a debate in the House of Lords last week where Lord Faulkner described a visit to the Argentine parliament and reported that the Argentine-British parliamentary group in the Congress was reformed and that there is a desire to open a dialogue at a parliamentary level. "Of great interest to the parlia-

"Of great interest to the parliamentarians—certainly to those who wish to look forwards rather than backwards—was the agreement between Britain and Spain over Gibraltar, which was concluded in September, just prior to our visit." said Lord Faulkner.

Deputy Jorge Arguello, chairman of the Argentine Congress's foreign relations committee, visited London in the middle of October. There to speak to the British-Argentine All-Party Parliamentary Group Dr Arguello told that meeting that he and his colleagues were studying the terms of the Gibraltar settlement and would be sending them their views on it.

"Whether anything comes of that, we shall have to wait and see," said Lord Faulkner, With the Argentine presidential election taking place next year Lord Faulkner said he would not be too confident of much progress being made at government level in Buenos Aires.

"Maybe parliamentary diplomacy offers better prospects, rather as it did when Argentina sent a delegation to the IPU centenary conference in London back in 1989, the year before diplomatic relations were formally restored after the war," he said.

Lord Faulkner took the opportunity of the Lords debate to congratulate the Government, and the Governments of Spain and Gibraltar, on reaching, "what is clearly a very satisfactory conclusion".

He said that the agreement has brought to an end decades of ill will, harassment, misunderstanding and hostility between Spain and Gibraltar. "It covers the use of Gibraltar airport, the lifting of Spanish airspace restrictions, the opening of the border, the paying of pensions to Spanish workers in Gibraltar and the recognition of Gibraltar's international dialling code. The agreement reflects well on the three parties involved."

He said that a number of aspects of the negotiations and the agreement are particularly interesting.

First, the Gibraltarians were allowed by the Spanish Government to take part in the discussions in their own right. Previously, they had insisted that Gibraltanans could take part in talks only as part of the British team. Secondly, the agreement provides that the British Government retain international responsibility for Gibraltar. Thirdly, Spain has not been required to abandon its sovereignty claim on Gibraltar, although it has effectively been allowed to park it in a siding while the rest of the agreement is implemented.

"I found particularly interesting the comments made by the Spanish Foreign Office official, José Pons, in an interview with the *Gibraltar Chronicle* on 12 June this year. He described the trilateral dialogue as an historic opportunity to achieve normal and prosperous cross-border relations, 'without any of the sides having to renounce their positions of principle'"

The obvious question, he said, is whether any lessons can be learnt from the agreement with Spain over Gibraltar that could have relevance to the dispute with Argentina over the Falklands.

Goodbye to by-catch?

Fishery Scientist THE Rock Cod – Patagonotothen ramsayi – has very little to do with rocks and nothing to do with cod.

It does not live between inshore rocks, but generally much deeper, mostly at 100-300m, and prefers soft grounds (though not in the spawning season). Also, it is very different from anything cod-like. It belongs to the specific perchlike family Notothenridae, which can boast of its absolute predomination in Antarctic waters. The Patagonian toothfish is the most famous and tasty representative of this diverse fish group.

Unlike real cod, the rock cod is quite a small creature, usual size of adults being about 20-25 cm. This tiny fish could live for as long as 14 years - about half that of toothfish and trout. It spawns on rough grounds - a useful habit that protects males, which take care of egg mass, from fishing impacts. Among small-sized predators the species is as fastidious as the locust among plant-eaters. The rock cod feeds opportunistically upon a wide variety of prey: anything from small jellyfish to benthic crustaceans, fish larvae and carrion.

A combination of a good protection of its spawned eggs (rocky grounds - against vessels, angry disturbed male – against small predators) and a flexibility of its feeding habits make this species quite resiltent to environmental changes induced by climate or fisheries. Due to its relative abundance, the rock cod always represented the bulk of by-catch in the Falkland Islands fisheries.

Estimation of by-catch carried out by the Falklands Conservation in early 1990s revealed that trawlers targeting *Loligo* squid discarded about 2,500 - 5,000 tonnes of fish (mean 48 kg per one tonne of processed Loligo). Another three thousand tonnes or so were discarded by finfish trawlers. Such a situation lasted for about 12-15 years. Estimations based on fisheries observer data showed that in the new millennium Falkland fisheries discarded annually about 7.000-8,000 tonnes of undesirable fish and bottom invertebrates. The rock cod represented about a half of this amount. This food rain was accompanied by a tropical shower of fishing offal - discharge resulting from processing the product onboard: guts, head, tails, skin that amounted annually to 17,000 -20.000 tonnes. In spite of intensive opportunistic harvesting of this resource by albatrosses and other seabirds, an important amount of organic matter reaches the sea floor being exploited by most of the finfish species.

The southwest Atlantic rock cod was not always ignored by fishermen. As a student in the former USSR I remember this species sold as a "small oceanic pikeperch". A dull promotion of the product was obvious, because the normal freshwater pikeperch was a fish of high commercial value. The rock cod was fished together with Illex squid on high seas by trawlers. And it has been bought by customers not because it was promoted, really it was a good fish ... its only weak place was that it was small. Easier to dump than to make a fillet.

To solve the problem of discarding this valuable protein source.



a European Union funded project started in February 2003. The project title was eloquent: "Promoting higher added value to a finfish species rejected to sea" and had "Rockcod Project" as its mini title. The project's aim was to develop the research and technology necessary to produce a viable and commercial product from a species that previously had no value. From the Falkland side, Dr. Paul Brickle was responsible for investigating the biology of Patagonotothen ramsavi. Many of the aspects of the life style of P. ramsavi needed to be elucidated before any attempt at stock assessment can be made. This is important especially if this was to become a targeted fishery.

While the Falklands scientists were investigating different aspects of rock cod biology important for the stock management, Spanish fishermen and technologists were working in earnest on a practical side of the problem. The fishing year 2003 resulted in a tentative commercial catch of 313 tonnes of rock cod. Next year this amount was more than doubled tonnes. Further events demonstrated that the EU project began at the very moment when the Falkland Islands fisheries needed it - in the years 2005-2006 the rock cod just exploded in abundance. Environmental causes of this explosion are not clear yet, probably they were the same that those leading to a temporarily depletion Illes squid stocks.

During the first ten months of 2006 a total of 18,000 tonnes of rock cod was caught, which is 5-10 times more than combined reported catch of all "others" in the years 1999-2003, and similar to the catch of hoki (17,000) and bluewhiting (14,000) for the same period. Catches of 10-20 tonnes a day were quite normal. About 8,500 tonnes were processed, almost exclusively by finfish boats that used two thirds of their rock cod catch. *Loligo* vessels still largely ignore this tiny fish, probably because of difficulties with its processing onboard.

Nobody can say now, for how long this high abundance of rock cod will last. Is it a permanent change in the ecosystem that will not only make fishermen happy but also provide a lot of unexpected food for Patagonian toothfish. hakes, kingclip and other non-hu-man fish eaters? Or is it just a tem-porary phenomenon? This is still a question to be investigated. One thing is evident: the most important component amongst discarded species has acquired a deserved recognition now and is very appreciated by fishermen. A decrease in discards will also result in trawlers being less attractive to albatrosses, although seabird mortalities in these fisheries are extremely low due to the implementation of effective mitigation measures.

A trip down memory lane

Twenty-five years ago, November 29, 1981 IN AN amazingly close vote in the House of Lords, a motion that would from the UK as they please, is defeated. Many people were hopeful that the result would be favourable for the 300+ who are not allowed to live and work in the UK. Falkland Islanders who do not have a parent or grandparent born in the United Kingdom will be considered citizens of the British Dependent Territories, they will have a British passport, but the words 'holder is entitled to the right of abode in the United Kingdom' will be well inked out. The Falkland Islands Committee, a UK based pressure group placed considerable pressure on parliament to consider Islanders favourably and a petition was presented to Number 10 Downing Street. The feeling in the Falklands is one of resigned anger - people are not surprised that they have been pushed a little further out into the cold. Newly-elected councillors Terry Peck and Ron Binnie ruffle govern-

ment feathers with criticisms of slow progress on the Darwin Road. Mr Peck also blasts the government housing policy saying that many houses Peck also blasts the government housing policy saying that many houses are in dire need of repair and are ignored in favour of more elaborate dwellings often occupied by expatriate English staff. Mr Peck also ex-pressed his concern at the influence and property that the Argentine Government now has in the Islands referring to the LADE houses, office and gas and fuel depots. "Enough is enough," he said. Communications company Cable and Wireless confirm that two of their watchkeeping staff have been given twelve months notice of the arminotice of their employment as part of an economicing process.

termination of their employment as part of an economising process. In Executive Council it is agreed that Falklands Fisheries Patrol vessels should be armed and strict rules of engagement are to be drawn up. Members hear from the Director of Fisheries that it is hoped revenue from the first fishing season will be in the order of £18 million.

Goose egg and crab woked omelette (by Coralee Epstein)

Serves 4 4 goose eggs 2 tablespoons fish sauce 2 tablespoons water or stock 2 green onions finely chopped 1 small red chilli finely chopped I handful wild celery finely chopped 200gms crab meat 1/2 cup oyster sauce 1 carton mascarpone (from Kevin at Stanley Dairy) 5 tablespoons of sesame oil

Lightly beat goose eggs with fish sauce and stock. Add 1 tablespoon of the oil to a hot wok, add green onions, chilli and wild celery cook, for 1-3 minutes until golden, add to egg mixture. Combine crab meat, mascarpone and oyster sauce mix well.

Heat 14 of the remaining oil in the wok, coat it well, when smoking add 14 of the egg mixture. Working quickly push the cooked egg mixture into the centre of the wok and swish the uncooked mixture to the outside

When the omelette is almost set, spread ¼ of the crab mixture evenly onto 1/2 of the omelette, fold over and slide it carefully out of the wok on to absorbent paper; keep warm (you can fold it into quarters if you are using a large wok).

Repeat with remaining mixture.

Serve immediately with a crunchy salad (carrot and pickled ginger works well).

Stuttering or stammering in young children

STUTTERING or stammering consists of interruptions to the smooth flow of speech. The person who stutters may:
Repeat sounds, syllables, words

or phrases

Lengthen some sounds in words

Block or get stuck on sounds

Avoid looking at you when

speaking • Blink or have unusual body or facial movements.

About 5% of children start to stutter, usually around the ages of three to four. It typically occurs as children are starting to put words together into short sentences. The onset of stuttering can be mild or severe. Many children improve as they get better at expressing their thoughts. What causes stuttering?

There are many theories and popular beliefs about what causes stuttering. However, the cause of the disorder still remains a mystery. We think that stuttering is most likely due to some problem with the neural processing (brain activity) that underlies speech production.

Whatever the problem is. however, it seems to be almost entirely confined to speech production, and there are no basic differences that distinguish clearly between people who stutter and people who do not. For example, people who stutter are not as a group less intelligent, or less well co-ordinated and so on, than people who do not stutter.

Stuttering is thought to be a physical disorder and is not thought to be caused by psychological factors such as nervousness or stress, or parenting practices, or the way parents communicate with their children when they are young.

Stuttering does tend to run in families, however, the precise nature of its inheritance is unknown at present.

In what situation does stuttering occur?

In general children speak less fluently under certain condition:

- When they are very excited
- When they are tired or ill ٠
- When they are competing with others who are speaking

When they are trying to tell you about something which is difficult for them to express, something which might happen or something which happened some time ago

• When they are using new words, or new ways of organising the words

· You are worried about your child's speech.

Treatment


There are many different treatments for stuttering. I favour an evidence-based approach to treatment for stuttering. This means that treatments are backed by scientific research to support their effectiveness

I believe it is better to seek advice while the child is still young. ideally before they start school, rather than "hoping they will grow out of it'

Wool report - week ending November 24 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices continued their roller coaster ride of the last few weeks. Significant price falls occurred in South Africa and Australia. Some catch-up price rises however were evident in New Zealand, particularly at the finer end of the micron spectrum.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide", all micron categories suffered losses of between 6 and 15 pence per kilogram clean with the exception of 25 micron fleece lots which held "firm" in price

For fleece wool lots of between 18 and 24 micron, price falls wiped away approximately two thirds of last weeks price increases while losses for lots broader than 25 micron were quite extreme compared to last weeks modest increases.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down 9 pence per kilogram at 334.4 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 343.1 pence per kilogram clean

In Australia 81% of the 60,362 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 7,260 bales of cross-

bred wool of which 75% was sold. In New Zealand 85% of the 23,219 bales offered were cleared while in South Africa 85% of the 13,361 bales available were sold.

Sales continue next week in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia with a combined offering of almost 85,000 bales.



Lord Triesman to make whistle-stop visit

LORD Triesman, the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) Minister responsible for relations with the UK Overseas Territories, will visit the Falkland Islands on December 15 and 16 before travelling to Chile for an official visit there.

He will meet councillors, sentor officials and members of the Chamber of Commerce during his short stay, and will receive a mihtary briefing from the Commander of British Forces.

The Governor will host a dinner for Lord Triesman and his party at Government House.

A Government House spokesperson said the purpose of Lord Triesman's visit is, "...to discuss issues affecting the Falklands and hear about matters of concern to Falkland Islanders at first hand as well as to appreciate the substantial social and economic progress that has been made in recent years,"

Good governance' paper

Falklands councillors Andrea Clausen and Mike Summers met Lord Triesman when they attended the Overseas Territories Consultative Council (OTCC) held in London on November 21 and 22, at which the FCO presented a draft paper on 'good governance'. This followed

requests from Overseas Territories at previous conferences for the concept of good governance contained in the Overseas Territories White Paper to be further defined.

Following discussions a paper was agreed which, a spokesperson from Gilbert House said, sets out, "...a number of aspirations and benchmarks against which we can measure ourselves both in elected government and in public service. It also helps to explain the role of the Governor in this process."

Councillor Mike Summers said the release of the paper has "broad implications" for the Constitutional review which is underway in the Falklands, "...in that in developing the Constitution we should always be seeking to incorporate the elements of good governance into our legal and administrative systems and procedures.

"The broad content of this document has been known to us for some time, and we will have no difficulty in including all these elements."

He said the document also helps to define the areas in which the Governor will take most interest in protecting the legitimate interests of Her Majesty's Government in accordance with the 1999 White Paper on the Overseas Territories; the actual procedures for that are set out in the Constitution.

"This is an area where the review calls for greater definition in future." Councillor Summers said.

'Poncet' and 'Nicholls' newest South Georgia names

TWO NEW place names have been approved by Mr Alan Huckle, the Commissioner for South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands.

Poncet Island and Nicholls Peak were recommended to him after a recent meeting of the South Georgia Place Names Committee which sits in the British Antarctic Survey headquarters in Cambridge, UK.

Poncet Island (54°45°17"S, 36°18'30"W) lies at the most easterly of the Kupriyanov Islands, at the entrance to Diaz Cove. It hosts a wide selection of breeding Antarctic sea birds including Wandering albatross, Light-mantled Sooty albatross, Southern Giant petrel, Antarctic prion and Whitechinned petrel.

First Secretary Harriet Hall said the island is being named after Jérôme and Sally Poncet, "...who have both made outstanding contributions to science, support and knowledge on South Georgia for over 30 years.

"It is hoped that the vibrant wildlife on Poncet Island continues to be a fitting tribute to their unique role."

Volunteers needed for pilgrimage planning

Nicholls Peak (54°11'42"S, 36°56'37"W) is one of the Wilckens range which form an arc around the northern margin of the Kohl Larsen Plateau.

It is being named after Brigadier David Vernon Nicholls RM (1949-2006) a former Commander of British Forces in the Falklands who dedicated his working life to South Georgia after his retirement from the Royal Marines.

Ms Hall commented, "He was, amongst other things, founder and Chairman of the South Georgia Heritage Trust: Chairman of the South Georgia Expeditions Advisory Panel and Chief Leader of the British Schools Expedition Society (BSES) Footsteps of Shackleton Expedition 2003-2004 which succeeded in climbing Nicholls Peak."

Ms Hall said that if any readers have suggestions of people with a long or significant connection to South Georgia which they would like the Committee to consider, they should send them to Alison Martin, the Secretary of the SG Place Names Committee. Her email address is amart@bas.ac.uk.

Defence of self defence wins case | Bobbies clock up the miles off the beat

FOLLOWING a trial of one and a half days, Dustin Gilson-Clarke was yesterday acquitted of assault in the Senior Magistrate's Court. He had been accused of assaulting Richard Morrison in early September.

Prosecution counsel Alison Inglis said the two had been at a dining in night at the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) club in honour of the new Governor Alan Huckle with invited guests from Mount Pleasant and Stanley.

A Lance Corporal with the FIDF, Mr Gilson-Clarke arrived early to meet and greet guests dressed in his blues uniform and then changed, leaving his uniform in Sgt Paul Watson's office, and went to join his fiance Toni Clifford for the five course dinner

Ms Inglis said that later in the evening some of the remaining guests decided to dance and the music volume was raised, but was at a level that conversation could still be held.

Mr Morrison, a Corporal in the FIDF who had served in the British army for 17 years leaving in 1994 with the rank of Major, also attended the event. Mr Morrison objected to the volume and turned the music off. Dr Jacqueline Bennebroek switched it back on and Mr Morrison then switched it off at the mains, disconnected the speaker and placed it out the fire exit door.

An altercation later took place between Mr Morrison and Mr Clarke which resulted in Mr Morrison receiving injuries to his nose and teeth.

Mr Morrison said that when he was ready to leave he escorted his partner to the toilets beyond the function room and adjacent to the drill hall and then went to leave by the drill hall main entrance to go to the car and collect their coats and shoes to walk home

Mr Morrison said the door was locked and alleged that Mr Gilson-Clarke entered the foyer, said "I've been looking after you for years," and head butted him. He said he curled into a defensive position and received several other blows. He said he had done nothing to provoke the attack, and that there had not been a word exchanged between them all evening. Mr Morrison said he was not drunk. However several witnesses gave evidence to the contrary.

Nigel Bishop, a Corporal in the FIDF, said that he had intervened earlier in the evening when, after the music was turned down, he had seen Mr Morrison approach Mr Clarke and shout at him. Mr Bishop said that in his opinion the music was not too loud, adding that he was with two of his friends and together they would normally be "grumpy old men" if music was played at an excessive volume.

Giving evidence, Mr Gilson-Clarke said he had been making his

way to the office to collect his uniform before going home when he saw Mr Morrison crouched down on the left side of the foyer near the corridor leading to the garage.

He said he was shocked to see him there and tried to talk to him as he did not want what had been "a fab

evening" to end on a bad note. Mr Gilson-Clarke said Mr Morrison "lost it" and came straight at him with his arms flailing. He said he backed off until he was against the wall and then stepped forward and hit him with his head. He said Mr Morrison took one step back but did not fall as he had hoped so that he could "leg it."

Mr Gilson-Clarke said Mr Morrison charged at him with his shoulder to his abdomen and pushed him against the wall. He said he brought a knee up which brushed him and had no deterring effect and then repeated the action striking him, he believed, in the nose; he then pushed Mr Morrison away

Mr Gilson-Clarke said Mr Morrison then stood up and said "You're f****d now, I'm ringing the police." Both men returned to the function room where the police and medical services were informed.


Mr Morrison was seen by Dr Diggle who told the court he first saw him lying on the floor, face down, hyperventilating and, "clearly very drunk."

In summarising the defence's case, lawyer Keith Watson said that the evidence from the event came from prosecution witnesses, not defence witnesses. He said he took very little exception to anything that had been said apart from the evidence given by Mr Morrison. Mr Watson said the court could only convict if the defendant's version of events is not true and the court is satisfied beyond all reasonable doubt that this is the case.

In delivering the not guilty verdict Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said that Mr Gilson-Clarke's evidence was consistent with a police interview taped on September 9.

She said she had paid attention in particular to the evidence of Mr Morrison, Mr Gilson-Clarke and Dr Diggle. Dr Diggle had volunteered the information that if the damage to the complainant's nose and teeth had been a result of the head butt he would have expected an injury to the centre of Mr Gilson-Clarke's head, as it was it was consistent with two separate blows.

Mrs Faulds said that when balancing the evidence, Mr Morrison's behaviour seemed unpredictable and Mr Gilson-Clarke had been thrown into self defence. She was not persuaded that he had damaged "the defence of self defence", adding that to make a conviction she would have to be satisfied beyond all reasonable doubt. She acquitted the defendant.




Tumbledown triumph for Drew and Caitlin



THE Falkland Islands Wool Company has officially been incorporated.

At a meeting of the Falkland Islands Development Board on Tuesday, Chief Executive Chris Simpkins said the company's board is expected to meet on December 11 and will be asked to conclude terms for the appointment of Mr David Lambert.

In the past, some readers of Penguin News have questioned why the job which Mr Lambert is expected to fill has not been advertised locally when this is normally required.

Chair of FIDB Councillor Andrea Clausen said the Immigration Ordinance actually provides that the Principal Immigration Officer (PIO) may require a job to be advertised.

"In practice, the discretion under the Ordinance has been exercised in reverse, ie the PIO sometimes decides, on the basis of cases put to him, not to require a position to be advertised and that is what he has done on this occasion. The Governor also exercised the discretion available to him.

She added, "In this case the Principal Immigration Officer and the Governor have used their discretion to accept the case that no job application is required."

Accidental death verdict in seamen's inquest

THE induest into the death of a Spanish seaman working on the trawler Golden Chicha was closed by Her Majesty's Coroner, Clare Faulds, on Monday with a verdict of accidental death by drowning being recorded.

Mrs Faulds said that Jose Manuel Antepazo Marcial's (43) death resulted from being dragged into the sea by the trawl net following the failure of the safety hook on the net-hauling cable.

Despite the efforts of the captain and crew of the Golden Chicha, it proved impossible to reach him with a lifebelt or the lifeboat in time to prevent him from drowning.

Mrs Faulds said his death was a tragic accident and his colleagues are to be congratulated for their efforts to save him.

"The speed with which he drowned, despite the fact that he could swim and was wearing a life vest, shows how great the dangers are to fishermen," concluded Mrs Faulds who extended her sympathy to Mr Antepazo's father and wider family and to his friends and colleagues.

Solar panels mark Hotel's 'green' campaign

IN A move to be more 'green', Malvina House Hotel has had solar panels installed.

O HOW much has it cost for the work to the bank between the school and the sports field? Is it true that it is soon to be dug up again for a new heating system? If so why has the work been allowed to go ahead at this time?

A Our thanks to PWD Works Manager, Glen Williams, for the following answer.

The total cost of the landscaping works to the south-facing bank between the school and sports field from Reservoir Rd to the Government House gardens is estimated to be £1,837.50. This cost includes all materials, labour, temporary fencing, protective fleece cover, grass seed and fertilizer up to the first cut.

The very top of the bank from the steps to the sports field to the east gate leading onto Reservoir Rd will be carefully excavated in January to allow a new waste heat recovery system from the Stanley Power Station to supply the Hospital, in addition to the Community School.

The original plan was for the order of works to be the reverse but the lead in time for some key items for the heat recovery scheme extended such that it became apparent that unless the best part of the growing season was to be missed this could no longer be the case

It was decided that the landscaping works should continue as the majority of the repairs were to the slope itself and to the main pitch and not the top section of bank where trenching works for the heating pipe work will be routed.

When these works are completed the route will be re-landscaped to match the already repaired sections of the slope.

Why was joint police charge dropped?

THE Attorney General, Melanie Chilton, explained has the background behind the discontinuation of a joint charge faced by two police officers last month

On November 10, Superintendent David Morris was found guilty of a charge that on March 28, 2005, with intent to pervert the course of justice he did an act which had a tendency to pervert the course of public justice in that he brought pressure to bear on Inspector McGill to terminate a police enquiry into an assault alleged to have been committed by Jason Morris. his son Within hours of the verdict Mr

Morris became very ill, and so was unfit to stand trial on November 13 with Detective Sergeant Butler ('trial 2'), with whom he was jointly charged. The prosecution under-stood that Mr Morris was unlikely to be fit to stand trial for some time. As a result, the question arose as to whether, and if so on what basis. the prosecution should proceed.

Mrs Chilton said the Code for Crown Prosecutors states that Crown Prosecutors must continue to review decisions to prosecute and must take account of any change in circumstances.

"In the light of Mr Morris' illness, the prosecution considered whether to apply for an adjourn-ment of the joint charge against Mr Morris and Mr Butler, and concluded that it would not be appropriate, since the wait for a new and uncertain trial date would have an undesirable impact on Mr Morris and Mr Butler, 12 months having al-ready elapsed since their arrest.

"Further, significant trial costs had already been incurred, for example in the attendance of counsel and meeting the travel costs of po-lice and other UK witnesses. Any adjournment for a new trial date would have resulted in a substantial duplication of costs, and would no doubt have encountered logistical difficulties e.g. in arranging for the attendance again of an Acting Senfor Magistrate and three counsel from the UK, not to mention witnesses

"It was also considered that further delays would be undesirable in terms of public confidence in the police service.

Consideration was given as to whether to adjourn the charge against Mr Morris and proceed with that against Mr Butler, Mrs Chilton said, notwithstanding they were jointly charged. However, apart from the adjournment issues referred to above, this would have meant that prosecution witnesses would have had to give evidence twice about the same matter, "...which may have been prejudicial to the case, would have dupli-cated costs, and added to the stress of witnesses.

The Attorney General, having sought the advice of Prosecuting Counsel, decided to discontinue the second charge against Mr Morris, "having taken into account that Mr Morris had already been found guilty of a serious charge of a similar nature in trial 1, which was arguably the more serious charge, and was unlikely, if convicted in trial 2, to receive an appreciably greater sentence

Mrs Chilton said she considered was right and proper that Mr Morris be made aware of this decision without delay for compassionate reasons and that Mr Butler and the court be immediately informed.

'Having carefully considered the impact on the prosecution case of Mr Morris no longer being jointly charged with Mr Butler, it was indi-cated to Mr Butler's counsel that the prosecution would be prepared to accept a guilty plea to a charge of misconduct in a public office, which is in itself a serious charge." On November 13 Mr Butler

pleaded guilty to this charge and in so doing admitted that his misconduct was "serious and injurious to the public interest in that it risked damaging public confidence in the integrity of the Royal Falkland Islands Police"

Any suggestion that the prosecution acted as it did because it was concerned as to what might come out in the trial is "wholly wrong". Mrs Chilton said, and has no evidential basis. "Mr Butler did not have to plead guilty to the alterna-tive charge: if he had not pleaded guilty the trial would have proceeded. If Mr Butler wishes to make a complaint against any government officer he may still do so and his complaint will be investigated."

At the beginning of Mr Morris' trial (for the first, sole charge of which he was found guilty), the Acting Senior Magistrate Curran, was informed of an assertion by the defendant that there was an issue that someone, not identified other than being in government, was bringing the proceedings to deprive Mr Morris of his pension rights. Mrs Chilton said the prosecution was aware of this assertion from the time the defence case statement was served, ...and clearly such an allegation did not prevent the prosecution from pursuing the charge through to a full trial

She added, "It should be noted that the judgment states 'this allegation in particular has not been pursued in evidence, nor has any allegation of mala fides - bad faith been pursued as far as the bringing of the prosecution is concerned'.

'In fact, there was no mechanism by which Mr Morris could have been denied his pension rights and so the assertion was clearly incorrect. Mr Morris is at liberty 10 make a complaint should he so wish

As most people will be aware Steve was one of **two** police constables pressured to change their statements in July last year.

This incident (and nothing else) is what Steve was called to the Sceretariat for last year, as apparently there was word on the street about it. So he was approached first. He was also told at another meeting with the Principal Crown Counsel that he didn't actually have to give a statement but that there would be an investigation anyway. He did decide however to make a statement, explaining what had happened, as he felt and strongly believed it was not right.


Steve had no involvement at all in the first case - which led to the sole charge against Mr Morris - just in case some people have failed to notice this.

This whole thing over the last year has been awful for many people. Steve and myself included, as we have had to suffer too. Why not ask and maybe find out what exactly did happen before casting judgement on someone (remember, there are always two sides to a story).

Not one person who has decided to judge Steve has ever asked him his side. I personally think that maybe they don't want to know, as it is far easier to put the blame on someone than to actually hear and face the truth themselves. That is their choice and they have to live with it.

Steve has never been guilty of letting anyone down. He has strong good morals and values which sadly meant that he no longer felt he could earry on working for the RFIP at the time. He was treated wrongly and stood up for himself and when asked if he would speak out he did. I supported and encouraged him to speak out at the time and am very proud of him.

I will start off with a little joke: a man says in a meeting "my name is Tex and I haven't found it necessary to have a drink for five years now." Another guy says, "That's a he Tex. I saw you drunk as a lord he Tex. I saw you drunk as a lord only yesterday." Tex replies, "Yes, that's true, but it wasn't necessary!"

This is not meant as a lecture, only to share my experience with you. I can remember at Christmas time, my mum cooking a nice Christmas lunch, which took her all morning to cook, only to see me arrive home drunk and only eat half of it, she never said anything, but it must have been so disheartening. This is only one example of what a selfish disease alcoholism is, I could share many more stories with you all, but I wish to hold on to my dignity!

I have been sober for three years now, and the only reason I say this is not to boost my ego, but to just prove to you that it is possible to stop drinking if you wish it above all else.

When I was sharing at a recent

meeting for families of alcoholics, it was heartbreaking to hear what it was like to live with a drinking alcoholic; although sad, it strengthened my resolve to stay sober, so that I never put anyone else through that living hell ever again. I have got so much from being sober, and have done shares all over the West Country, including Worcester and Bristol. I go to conventions all over the UK, and it is my ambition to visit the worldwide convention in Toronto in two years' time.

I don't have to be locked in to that alcoholic thinking anymore. It came as a great surprise to me when I was told that the alcohol was only a sympton of my disease and that the problem was with me.l was told to go on to the 12 step programme of recovery and do some service. I was told by my sponsor that the trouble with my life was that there was too much of me in it!

I will finish on this, my Christmases have been the happiest since I have been able to spend time with my children, rather than in the pub, getting drunk.

Holberg: 'Fisheries Committee had considered coastal impacts'

THE trawler *Holberg*, which remains stranded in Port Purvis after it grounded there in early November, had consent to be trawling in the area.

In a response to a number of questions from Councillor Mike Summers about the incident, Chief Executive Chris Simpkins said permission to be in Port Purvis had come from the Director of Fisherics.

Councillor Summers had asked who gave permission for the vessel to trawl for scallops in Port Purvis, "...which is an almost entirely enclosed pristine internal waterway with significant amounts of wildlife."

Mr Simpkins said the Holberg was undertaking fishing operations in accordance with the provisions of a fishing licence issued by the Director of Fisheries using the powers available to him in the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2005. "The licence was generally intended for offshore operations although, as part of the exploratory programme, trawls were permitted within three miles with the consent of FIG's representative on board, ie the Observer.

"Such consent to enter Port Purvis to fish was granted by the Observer following consultation with the Director of Fisheries."

Councillor Summers asked whether the matter had ever been referred to the Fisheries Advisory Committee and, if so, what their recommendation was.

The issue of exploratory scallop fishing was considered by the Fisheries Committee on a number of occasions, Mr Simpkins said. "In particular the issue was considered in September 2004. Whilst Port Purvis was not specifically considered, operations in coastal or near shore areas were discussed." On the basis of information presented to the Fisheries Committee, he said, the exploratory fishery was supported, "...although, as indicated, Port Purvis was not specifically mentioned at meetings of the Committee

"Certain other areas, for example the Beauchene Island area were excluded. Fishing plans were drawn up on the basis of where scallops were likely to be found. This relied on the skipper's experience, reports from other vessels, and local information."

Councillor Summers questioned how such activity could be contemplated without an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA). but Mr Simpkins said there is no requirement for an EIA to be made and approved before granting a licence.

However, he added, in granting a licence, the Director of Fisheries is required by the Ordinance to have regard to a number of factors including environmental issues.

"The issue of potential impact was raised in the Fisheries Committee. A number of factors were taken into account in reaching the conclusion that the operation would have a limited or acceptable impact."

He said these included: i) the trawls operated by the



vessel are relatively small; the area

covered during exploratory fishing is low compared to the total area.

ii) tows are of short duration, typically ten minutes or less.

iii) operations are generally conducted on smooth, sandy or muddy bottoms where diversity of habitats is low.

iv) an observer was present throughout, if harmful or unforeseen impacts were observed through examination of the contents of the net, then the operation could have been stopped quickly.

 v) any interaction with seabirds or marine mammals was to be reported.

"The assessment did not extend to considering the likelihood of the vessel grounding," Mr Simpkins said.

Councillor Summers asked what other "pristine areas" within the three mile limit have been trawled by the *Holberg* and with what effect.

Mr Simpkins said other inshore areas which have included some trawls within three miles have included Queen Charlotte Bay, the north coast of West Falkland, and the southern part of Falkland Sound.

"One trawl appears to have occurred at the edge of the three mile zone around Beauchene Island."

He said that the impact in terms of extent of the area trawled, and the results of those trawls "is assessed as being minor"

sessed as being minor". He added, "Scallops were found in some of the areas and some work was done to assess biomass. Such areas could be classed as pristine or relatively pristine although fishing and fishing surveys have taken place in some areas.

"The Fortoser inshore fisheries survey covered much of the Falklands, albeit mainly with pots, although with some trawling, as part of an assessment of the potential for inshore fisheries."

Mr Simpkins also commented on the action which has been taken by officials to try to secure the recovery of the *Holberg* and removal of the pollution threat.

He said the leaking fuel is marine gas oil which is, "light in nature and readily disperses naturally".

The use of detergents to disperse the oil sheen would do, "more harm than good" and the deployment of booms would be "ineffective" he said.

According to Mr Simpkins.

there is a misconception that the government has the power to enter upon stricken vessels to do whatever it feels is necessary. "That is not the case and, in fact, the powers available are really quite limited. The Governor can direct that action be taken if a shipping accident results in pollution, or a risk of pollution, or a large scale and the need for action is urgent.

"Such directions can be given to the owner, master or other person in possession of the ship for the purpose of preventing or reducing oil pollution, or the risk of oil pollution. There is no power for FIG to enter upon a vessel, carry out work and recover costs. Pollution in this case is not large scale."

Powers are also available in the Oil in Territorial Waters Ordinance 1960, he said. "This creates certain criminal offences where oil is discharged, or allowed to escape, into Falklands waters.

"The definition of oil in this ordinance is wide and includes marine gas oil. There are several defences available under the Ordinance but they require the master or owner to take all reasonable steps as soon as practicable after the damage or leakage is discovered, to stop or reduce the escape/ leakage of the oil.

"The maximum line for the relevant offences is £100,000. The possibility of a prosecution under this Ordinance is being examined."

Mr Simpkins reported that the Fisheries Department has been in constant contact with the owners of the vessel, "in an effort to secure details of their plans." He commented "Some work to

He commented "Some work to stem the flow of marine gas oil from the vessel has been carried out successfully by contractors employed by the owners of the vessel. Regular monitoring is taking place using FIGAS.

Mr Simpkins added, "It is understood that a vessel has been chartered and is currently on its way to the Falklands from Montevideo with a view to at least removing the pollutants.

"Any operation will be monitored by the Fisheries Department and options to secure the removal of the vessel are being examined. Once a final outcome has been achieved, a review will be undertaken to identify any lessons that need to be learnt, including the possibility of strengthening legal powers."

Expedition cruising: a fresh look at the western-most islands

WORKING for Sulivan Shipping. Sammy Marsh helps to organise shore excursions for cruise ship passengers who visit Stanley. The company also promotes Camp landings for smaller expedition ships around the Islands.

It was under this pretext that Sammy set off last week to visit some of the less accessible islands and experience expedition cruising first hand. Here she shares the highlights of her trip.

Having lived here all of my life, there are places in the Falklands that I have never been to, so when I was offered the opportunity to meet with the NG Endeavour at Carcass Island and sail to various destinations including New Island, Steeple Jason, and West Point, and join the passengers in their landings I jumped at the chance!

On Wednesday I was up bright and early ready to meet the Endeavour for her first call of the season at Carcass. The passengers were taken into smaller groups, and then had the choice of doing the main hike, which is about two miles around to Leopard Beach and back, or to simply mill around the settlement.

The small bird population on Carcass is abundant, but guess which birds the tourists asked after the most? Yes, the Upland Goose! What we consider a pest and a tasty meal was perhaps the most photographed species on Carcass. I didn't have the heart to tell them we also eat the goslings ...

So after some tea and cakes at the house. it was onto the ship for lunch and for the three hour sail to New Island. New Island has a stunning cliff face with an albatross colony, rock hopper colony and rock cormorants, all in the same area.

I should add at this point that the Endeavour staff keep a tight rein on the sometimes enthusiastic passengers and stop them from going too close to the wildlife or in this case the cliff edge. The general rule is no closer than



15 feet to eliminate wildlife distur-

Tony, Kim, Jack and Rosie Chater visited the ship in the evening, and Tony gave the passengers the opportunity to ask him questions about living on New Island. Each night the passengers are given a debriefing session to discuss the highlights of the day and what will be happening the following day. The NG Endeavour also has a diving team on board and they had fantastic underwater footage which was also shown.

Early next morning we approached the Jason Islands, with the aim of landing at Steeple Jason. We had all been

warned that landing at Steeple Jason is very difficult and weather dependent, but luckily we made it. It wasn't an easy landing and there was some very un-lady like scrambling up rocks from the zodiac, but that made it more worth while

Steeple Jason is quite simply breathtaking: it has the most dramatic landscape I have even seen, and it is also home to the largest colony of black browed albatross in the world.

The expedition staff emphasised the uniqueness and remoteness of Steeple Jason by drawing on the fact that so few local people had actually been there. The Endeavour passengers were genuinely shocked that I had never been to Steeple Jason.

They eventually believed it though when they realised just how excited I was about getting there. Not taking any chances on missing out, I wrangled a space on the first zodiac heading ashore.

The next landing was at West Point, picturesque with the gorse in full bloom. The walk was to the Devils Nose, home to albatross and rockhoppers, set against a dramatic backdrop of cliffs. The recently damaged Islander aircraft was also a huge attraction! Roddy and Lily Napier provided the passengers with tea and

home-made goodies and Jeanette life aspect stunning, you can't help Clarke's tame Johnny Rook was a source of entertainment. Some of the passengers followed the '15 feet' rule admirably, backing away from the Johnny Rook which was intent on extracting titbits until they reversed into a post or gorse bush.

Joining this cruise was an incredible experience for me, visiting places I have never been to before, and seeing the Islands with fresh eyes. I'm the first to admit to not being a wildlife buff, but even I found the wildbut be swept up by it.

A passenger met me on the hill returning from the Devils Nose and told me how lucky I was to live here, and as I looked down the hill towards the harbour with the yellow gorse and turquoise sea glinting in the sun, I had to agree with her.


The key, I think, is to remind ourselves of this every so often, look at things from a different perspective, and truly appreciate what we tend to take for granted.



Dumbarton Castle tours Saunders and Hill Cove

IT has been a busy fortnight for the ship's company of HMS Dumbarton Castle, conducting settlement visits. plenty of training and hosting VIPs.

As the ship travelled from its berth at East Cove to West Falkland, various exercises were conducted internally en route to ensure the ship's company is ready for any eventuality. This included man overboard. fire exercises and gunnery drills.

On Tuesday, November 21 a shore party from the ship visited the settlement on Saunders Island. After some initial difficulty negotiating the kelp, the party landed ashore and walked around to the old settlement of Port Egmont, before paying their respects at the graves of fellow servicemen buried on the hillside overlooking.

They then took the opportunity to raise a fresh Union flag on the flag post and sign the visitors' book. After a few moments of reflection they returned to the new settlement and were treated to tea and delicious homemade biscuits.

The members of the ship's company greatly enjoyed the visit and were amazed by the peace and beauty of the area.

Later in the week Dumbarton Castle had a visit from the Commodore of the Portsmouth Flotilla (COMPORFLOT) of which the ship is a part.

The Commodore arrived by Sea King helicopter for a fleeting visit to one of his longest deployed as-sets to ensure both the ship and her crew remain in good health.

During his brief stint with Dumbarton Castle he even managed to get ashore with six members of the ship's company as they visited the settlement at Hill Cove. They spent a couple of hours exploring the settlement and chatting with the locals who were more than happy to show off their unique way of life.

The ship has spent the last few days conducting exercises with the Lynx helicopter from HMS Endurance and the RAF Sea King from 78 Squadron. Under the watchful eye of the Aviation Training Team, the exercises ensured that Dumbarton Castle can perform the procedures expected of an operational unit.

This week has also seen visits to Dumbarton Castle by the new Commander British Forces South Atlantic Island (CBFSAI) and his Chief of Staff (COS) which has given us a great chance to demonstrate the ship's role here in the South Atlantic.

Dumbarton Castle will be visiting Stanley next week for the Bat-tle Day Commemorations.

The ship will be open to the public on Saturday, December 9; we look forward to seeing you on board.

A trip down memory lane

Twenty-two years ago, December 3, 1994

A HARRIER fighter jet crashes into Stanley Harbour. The pilot was able to eject safely a split second before the aircraft hit the water between the FIPASS floating dock and Whalebone Cove. He sustained some injuries, is being treated in the British Military Hospital and is said to be in good spirits. This brings the total number of fighter planes lost in the Falklands since 1982 to five. The Ministry of Defence convene a board of enquiry to determine the cause of the accident.

The very popular 'Little Chay' writes to his 'Uncle Wrecks' in great excitement about the new 'kons-stit-tewshun' and the possibility of his dad being able to obtain a job that will enable him to go to school in Ingland, and have holidays here two or three times a year.

The trawler *Coastal Pioneer* drops anchor in Falklands waters after a gruelling 56 day journey from the UK. One experienced seaman said it was the worst journey he had ever made in a ship. Based at Fox Bay East, the ship will spend its first six months sampling and examining inshore shell fish resources while desk bound officials of the company. Fortoser (in cooperation with FIDC and FIG) will study market potential in Europe and North America. Islander Delano (Dinks) Jennings is to Captain the ship throughout its research work.

The ex-Argentine Bell 'Huey' helicopter which is to eventually take pride of place in the Falklands war museum is seriously damaged by vandals who broke into the building sheltering the aircraft and other large war souvenirs. Bristows personnel have been helping with the restoration of the helicopter which was refurbished shortly after the war and painted in FIGAS colours with the intention of using it for passengers until it was decided that a structural weakness and high operating costs would make it unsuitable for use by civilians

Dennis Lampard is appointed as the government Veterinary Officer and Alison King and Paul Howe marry in Christ Church Cathedral.

Ten New Zealand shepherds recruited by the Falkland Islands Company Director, David Britton, arrive on board the Keren. A spokesperson said that the New Zealanders are better suited to work in the Falklands than shepherds from the UK who are accustomed to working on much smaller farms.

Twelve years ago, December 10, 1994

GOVERNMENT sources reveal that a 30 mph speed limit proposed by ExCo for the unsurfaced sections of the Stanley to Mount Pleasant Road will not now be imposed, pending further consideration of the situation.

Talks between Britain and Argentina over fishing rights in the South Atlantic are reported to have broken down over quota agreements for illex squid. Government officials were disinclined to give a reaction until they have been briefed on the conference by the Director of Fisheries, John Barton.

Paul Watson and Ruth Crowie marry in St Mary's Church and make their way to Government House in time to witness the Union Jack carried from Port Louis by Sharon Halford and a large group of horse riders of all ages to mark the 150th anniversary of the founding of Stanley, being raised.

Murrell mussels with coconut milk and chilli chutney

1kg mussels (approximately 8-10 per person) 100g butter 2 cloves garlic mashed 2 medium lecks peeled and sliced finely 4-6 new potatoes chopped roughly 1 cup of beer (the rest is for the cook) 2 beef tomatoes skinned seeded and finely chopped

400ml coconut milk 2 tablespoons chilli chutney Wild celery

Melt butter in a large deep pot, add leeks, wild celery and garlic and cook until soft and golden, add beer, potatoes and pepper, cover and cook for 5 minutes. Add coconut milk and scrubbed mussels, cover and cook for another 5 minutes shaking regularly to make sure they all get enough heat (good time to finish the beer). Remove mussels; get rid of any unopened mussels.

Turn up the heat and reduce the soupy stuff to half the amount, add chilli chutney, return the mussels, cover and give it a really good shake about. Serve equally into 4 big bowls add extra chopped wild celery and ground pepper. Serve with bread sticks to soak up soupy stuff and a couple of cold beers.

Wool report - week ending December 1 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices slipped in value at sales in New Zealand and Australia last week, but held in value in South Africa.

Overall, fine wool fleece lots in South Africa are trading at significant discounts to Australian auction rooms, while mid micron fleece lots (24 and 25 micron) continue to trade at significant premiums over similar micron fleece lots in Australia.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide", individual micron categories in Australia lost between 2 and 10 pence per kilogram clean. The only exceptions to this trend were 26 micron fleece lots which held "firm" in price.

were 26 micron fleece lots which held "firm" in price. The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down approximately 2 pence per kilogram at 332.7 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 334.4 pence per kilogram clean.

In Australia 87% of the 62,662 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 7,249 bales of crossbred wool of which 78% was sold. In New Zealand 78% of the 5,076 bales offered were cleared while in South Africa 96% of the 5,858 bales available were sold.

Sales continue next week in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia with a combined offering in excess of 100,000 bales. Note:


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
ON Saturday the ladies of the Mount Pleasant netball club invited Stanley for an afternoon of netball in the old gym at Mount Pleasant.







Status: to have and to hold?

SHOULD Falkland Islands Status be irrevocable or should the government retain the right to withdraw it?

That is just one of the questions councillors have been putting to the public as part of their consultation on the review of the Constitution.

Despite only attracting four members of the public at their latest meeting, held in the Council Chamber on Tuesday evening, the discussion was far from dull.

Councillor Mike Summers, the Chair of the Select Committee on the Constitution, gave a presentation - the same he had given to three meetings in Camp - on the amendments councillors propose to make to the Constitution.

The most important, he said, was to include the principal of selfdetermination in the body of the Constitution, not just in the preamble as it currently is. This was unquestioned at the meeting, however the circumstances in which a person enjoys Falkland Islands Status prompted more debate.

Under existing immigration law, it is possible to revoke the Status of some people, but not everyone. Councillor Summers explained, "Such circumstances (for revocation) are if someone is convicted of a very serious crime or if someone leaves for a long period of time." However, not everyone can have their Status revoked.

Councillor Summers said some of his colleagues argue that it is unfair to have two kinds of Status: one gained through birth and the other through application. Councillors have reached no particular resolution on this subject, he added, and asked the meeting for their views on whether revocation should be retained.

One member of the public said the current situation seemed to put people into "goodies and baddies" categories, with only those born or naturalised in the Falklands being free from revocation of Status; however another person wanted to see the ability to revoke Status kept.

She commented, "Keep it in. You don't know when you might have a situation that will need it," and added that the need for revocation comes down to, "the smallness of our society."

Also proposed is the protec-

tion of the right to free primary education for children; Councillor Summers said the Select Committee had discussed whether secondary education should also be included but decided against it, "...as it could lower the freedom for government if circumstances led us to make change."

A member of the public criticised this saying he felt free secondary education should also be included; another agreed, pointing out that the law says children must stay at school until they are 16 so it seemed illogical to not have free secondary education.

Councillor Summers responded that this would require the Falkland Islands to provide free education to everyone "regardless of their Status", which could lead to a large financial commitment in the future.

A second meeting is to be held next Tuesday, December 19, which will focus firstly on the structure of government.

If time permits a rerun will be presented of the remainder of the Constitution. The meeting will be held at 5pm at the Court and Council Chambers.

Attorney General's shock resignation

AFTER less than two months in the job, Attorney General Melanic Chilton has tendered her resignation.

Mrs Chilton took up the role in November after two years as Principal Crown Counsel.

Penguin News attempted to ascertain why Mrs Chilton had resigned, however Chief Executive Chris Simpkins would only say it was, "... for family health reasons," and refused to comment further.

Commenting on the news, Councillor Richard Davies said, "Melanie has only been in the job for the past two months but she has impressed us all with the way she's performed."

HAVING lived in a country with landmines for more than a decade, I am always - perhaps foolishly - stightly surprised when newcomers are apprehensive about heading out of Stanley and into the hills, or further out

into Camp, for fear of stepping on something explosive. The minefields are a very visible reminder of the war and always a bit of a shock to those new to the Islands, but to me it's as if they're now just part of the landscape: like the Town Hall, they're an ugly thing we have to live with.

I think most people will be interested to hear what ideas the visiting team come up with as a result of their first hand look at the minefields. While we argue that we would rather see the money spent in places where people are actually being injured or killed by mines on a daily basis - such as Angola - the fact is that Britain has an obligation to have its territory mine-free.

So we have to accept that it has to be done The question of how is perhaps more important.

I am far from knowledgable on the subject but I've heard some experts say in the past that the only way to truly clear the fields is to dig everything up and sift the mines out. This has catastrophic environmental implications: just take a trip along the MPA road, take a look at how long it has taken for the ditches to grow in and you'll get some idea of the long term damage this would cause - and that's if simple erosion doesn't set in.

Perhaps advances in technology will mean fields can be scanned and mines pinpointed for removal. But people would have to have 100% assurance that the land is clear - and even then, would you allow your children, or grand children, to test the accuracy?

Whatever the method, it's going to be expensive and it seems the money cannot be used elsewhere as Britain's obligation remains the same, the mines have to go. Let's just hope the environment doesn't suffer as a result.

MOST public meetings attract a good thirty or forty people yet the discussion on the Constitution - a subject that affects everyone living here - had a tiny response.

Once the new Constitution is in place, we'll have it for a long time, so now is the time to get your views across.

Perhaps councillors should consider setting up a bar in the council chamber, both to tempt in the punters and to gain people's 'real' views on their proposals.

A COUPLE of weeks ago we reported the sad news that former mine disposal officer David 'Aldo' Alderson had been wounded in Lebanon. We are pleased to report he is doing well in hospital in the UK and has

asked that his love be passed on to everyone in the Falklands.



Mummy's War to reveal Islands of now

JOURNALIST, television presenter and daughter of former British Prime Minister, Carol Thatcher has described the Falkland Islands as "fascinating"

Having spent ten days in the lslands - her second visit in around a month - Carol has been filming Mummy's War, a one hour film about the 25th anniversary of the Falklands conflict.

She said she wanted to see the Falklands of "then and now", ex-plaining, "...everyone I've talked to has said the place is unrecognisable and it's an incredibly heartening

story. "Let's not lose sight of the fact that 255 British servicemen were killed and there are people who will take a long time to recover from the ordeal, but overall people are saying, 'look we're in very good shape now'

Carol has spent time talking to Islanders, drawing out their stories from 1982 and their lives since. "We're getting some incredible tales that bring the headlines in the British newspapers at the time alive." She added, "The many books that

have been written, sometimes they gave the impression that the Falkland Islanders were sitting around waiting for the British Forces to turn up...and say 'bye bye Argies

"But I'm hearing so many tales of what they actually did from jamming radios to sprinkling bent metal on the roads to puncture the tyres of the Argentine military vehicles...

it's fascinating." Uniquely, Carol brings with her an insight into how life was for her mother during the war. "I saw slightly from the inside looking out because my mother was Prime Minister at the time: the strains and worries in London, the decision to send the Task Force, the ships that went down on the way, then indeed the Landings at San Carlos, right the way through to Liberation on June 14

When Carol was here in November she travelled to some of the outer islands, including Carcass Island and she commented upon the contrast with the images shown in Britain in 1982: "We had the impression of the army yomping across wet cold snow frosty peat but on that day at Carcass Island, the water was Caribbean blue - if not Caribbean tem-perature - and really quite a stun-ning island."

Mummy's War is expected to air in early April on Channel Four. To coincide with this, Penguin News will publish more of the interview with Carol Thatcher in April.

Cllr Davies talks self-determination in Fiji

COUNCILLOR Richard Davies says he gained a "good feel" for the arguments surrounding the issue of self-determination during a United Nations conference held in Fiji late last month.

He said the Pacific Regional Seminar gave him an insight into the Committee how on Decolonisation (C24) works: "It's to do with unwritten rules and customs, voting and taking sides on the basis of political alliance and interests.

In his presentation to the seminar, Councillor Davies said, he went in with the aim of staying away from the issue of sovereignty of the Falklands and focused on self-determination.

"Falkland Islanders have selfdetermination, the totally appropriate partnership with the sovereign of their choice; C24 should recognise that.

He said there had been some debate over the Falklands and he presented information provided by the government archivist Jane Cameron on the development of our democracy; he encouraged the seminar to forget about historic arguments, focusing on the rights of Islanders to determine their own future. Councillor Davies said he was

also keen to get the message across that, "Argentine sanctions might damage our economy but they won't change our minds. They can indulge in this behaviour and it might cause some damage but they are wasting their time.

While in Fiji, word of a coup began to spread at the meeting, Councillor Davies said. He commented, "The conference ran from Tuesday to Thursday. We had been aware of tension between the armed forces and the government of Fiji; and word was around that there would be a coup on the Friday if the prime minister did not resign.

"On the Friday morning the UN staff were pulled out." Councillor Davies said he decided

to use Friday as a day off and took a tour out of town with another delegate from the conference.

Upon their "rather nervous" return, they discovered that the coup had been put off until Mon-"...because there was an imdav. portant rugby match being held be-tween the police and the military!"

Exercise Silver Teal to test emergency response

A MAJOR exercise to test plans designed to deal with a major civilian emergency is to be held next week.

The government has been working with the military at Mount Pleasant to plan and run a major exercise for several months.

The exercise scenario on December 20 will be a fire on a cruise ship in Port William. For the purpose of the exercise, HMS Edinburgh will act as the cruise ship from which passengers will be evacuated by air and sea.

A spokesperson said that, under the overall control of the Gover-

nor, the exercise will, "...enable government departments to practice communication, evacuation, accommodation, health care, transport and feeding plans as well as testing the interface with military support.'

A large number of government staff will be involved in the exercise and any disruption to the public will be minimised. However, services at the hospital will be inevitably disrupted. Clinics and routine doctor's appointments have been cancelled but dental and podiatry services will continue as normal.

Man sent to prison for driving offences

MICHAEL HIRTLE has been given a custodial sentence for several driving offences.

In court last week Mr Hirtle pleaded guilty to drink driving, driv-ing without a vehicle license. driving whilst disqualified and driving without a valid insurance policy. Principal Crown Counsel Ros

Cheek told the court that on No-vember 21 the Police Station received a call saying that Mr Hirtle had driven off in a jeep and was drunk. Officers later located Mr Hirtle and he provided a positive breath sample later that evening of 108 micrograms per 100 millilitres of breath. The legal limit is 35 mg.

Mr Hirtle had previously been disqualified from driving for four years in January 2003. He was also still subject to a twelve month conditional discharge and a two year probation order from earlier this year.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds noted that this was the third time within a ten year period that Mr Hirtle had been convicted for charges of this nature and said imprisonment was the only way to deal with him

For driving whilst disqualified Mrs Faulds imposed a three month custodial sentence. For the drink driving charge, a three month custodial sentence was imposed to run todial sentence was imposed to run concurrently. Mr Hirtle also re-ceived fines totalling £1,000 for driving without a valid insurance policy and for driving without a vehicle license. For breaching the conditional discharge, he was given a antimation of cave down imprisona sentence of seven days imprisonment to run consecutively to the other custodial sentences.

Mr Hirtle also received a driving disqualification for seven years and was also ordered to pay £100 prosecution costs.

Mrs Faulds said she had taken into account Mr Hirtle's medical problem of alcohol abuse and said that she would be contacting inspector Len McGill to ask for a medical assessment for Mr Hirtle because of his drinking history FIRS/PN

By Graham France THIS meeting, held as usual in the Liberation Room at the Secretariat, was attended by councillors Richard Davies (chair) and Mike Rendell with lay members lain Berntsen and Mike Harris, the latter attending his last with the committee, with the recruitment process for his replacement to begin shortly. As Dominique Giudicelli (the

As Dominique Giudicelli (the Environmental Planning Officer), who apologised for her absence, was unable to be present, the applications were presented by Alan Dawson, the Building Adviser. Three of these which had been deferred at earlier meetings (an outline application for a dwelling at the rear of 10 Barrack Street for Joan Bound, a guyed mast and equipment hut proposed to be sited south of the FIDF HQ for Cable and Wireless, and a hatchery demonstration unit on land at Moody Brook for Brendan Gara), were again deferred.

The meeting then moved on to consider new applications, of which there were thirteen. Four sought permission in principle and all received conditional outline planning consent: housing development on land north of Goss Road for FIG; the erection of up to four two-bedroom houses at Lellman Way for PWD; a dwelling for James Lee at 10 Allardyce Street; and a house for Grant and Stacy Budd on land at and to the south of lan Campbell Drive.

The following applications received conditional detailed planning permission: a dwelling and garage with off-street parking for Jeff Halliday and Julie Bellhouse at 9a Philomel Place: a ground and new first floor extension to their dwelling at 12 Watson Way for Richard and Miranda McKee: the crection of a garage/workshop at 54 Davis Street for Melanie Clausen; installation of a satellite dish for KTV Limited at the rear of 4a St Mary's Walk; a dwelling at 1 Rowlands Rise for the Falklands Veterans Foundation; a house at 14 Fieldhouse Close for Lachlan Ross; and the provision of a new roof on their dwelling at 21 St Mary's Walk for Gail and Vernon Steen.

Temporary planning permission, in retrospect, was granted to Joost Pompert for the siting of a container for storage on land at the rear of 11 Ross Road West with the date of expiry being June 11, 2007.

Just one submission was deferred, that of a proposal submitted by the Falkland Islands Company for replacement conservatory windows at the Upland Goose Hotel on Ross Road. It was reported that further discussions are to be held on this application.

Five applications for Building Permits were next reported upon by Alan Dawson, who then explained his actions and progress on getting more containers in Stanley removed. Members also noted progress that had been made with his Planning Guidance Note on satellite dishes.

The next meeting of the committee is scheduled for Monday January 8, 2007 and is expected to be held again in the Liberation Room.

Youth court: burglary charges admitted

FOUR young people admitted to charges of burglary in the Youth Court late last week

The girls aged between 14 and 16 years admitted entering a storage building belonging to Peter and Emily Short's business, Falkhand Supplies. They removed a variety of items including a bottle of Vodka and a six pack of Budweiser.

Following up on information received, the police interviewed the 16 year old girl who said she had entered the building with her friends. She called it an opportunistic act.

A pink bracelet found on the floor of the storage cabin prompted the youth to name the others who had been with her. The two older girls had entered the premises a second time and removed 10 adaptors and 10 audio cassettes.

The case was adjourned until February 8, for pre-sentence reports to be prepared on the four youths.

One of the youths denied a further charge of supplying alcohol to juveniles in a private place and will reappear in the Youth Court for a pretrial review on December 14.

Driving offences

A 17 year old boy has admitted to driving without a driver's licence, vehicle licence or insurance on two separate occasions while on bail for another offence. He was ordered to do 100 hours of community service.

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek said that on September 15 the police received information that the youth intended to drive to Goose Green without a licence.

He was apprehended near Cameron's Pass on the Stanley to Darwin Road and taken back to Stanley, leaving the vehicle as it needed to be jump started.

The following day the police received information that the young man had in fact driven to Goose Green. He initially denied that he had driven saying that the vehicle had been towed, however after persistent questioning Ms Cheek said he admitted that he had driven to Goose Green. She described it as a "clear and defiberate act" after the previous day's activities.


Defence Lawyer Richard Marlor said his client was aware of the seriousness of the offences he had committed while on bail. He said that the youth was due in court two weeks later for a possible custodial sentence and wanted to join his friends for a weekend to "have fun and forget his woes."

He said that while the youth was not aware of the consequences at the time he had certainly been made aware of them now.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said the offences were too serious for a financial penalty adding that community service appeals because the youth could put something back into the community. She made the youth aware that com-

She made the youth aware that community service would severely curb his liberty and that the work is generally that which other people are not too keen to do.

Falklands justice delivers cruel Christmas present to father

TODAY I was given one of the worst Christmas presents possible by the Falklands justice system. Because the Falkland Islands do

not have an adequate youth justice system my daughter can no longer visit me in the country I live. This means she misses out on sharing my life for a month each year - the only time we have together. I find it incomprehensible that

a first time misjudgment by a young teenager has the consequence of effectively severing the relationship between a parent and a child. The only reason this relationship has been harmed is because the current justice system in the Falklands can-

where I live, her offence, to which she quickly admitted and apologised for, would have been addressed through the youth justice system as juvenile delinquency and not as a criminal matter.

Ironically the sentences that are actually given to youths in these circumstances are almost identical in both countries. But because, under the Falklands justice system,

she was charged with a criminal offence carrying a maximum term of more than a year in jail my daughter can no longer obtain a visa from

my country to visit me. I understand the rights of the child are a priority policy for the Falkland Islands Government and the subject of much discussion. While Councillors and officials talk and serve platitudes to the media and public, not once did the Attorney General, the Police or the Social Work Department attempt to protect my daughter's rights or wellbeing

I ask all of you to support an immediate review of youth justice in the Falkland Islands, one that protects the rights of the child and protects the interests of the Falkland Islands.

I ask this so that an inadequate youth justice system does not cause another parent of a Falkland Islands child to face not sharing Christmas at home with them again Name and address withheld

Youth justice system has room to improve but rights of the child are conformed to

IT IS not appropriate that 1 comment in relation to the circumstances surrounding the young person in this case, because every young person is entitled to confidentiality and their identities must be protected under the Youth Court system.

However, it is appropriate that I make some general comments in response to the letter appearing in the Penguin News headed "Falklands justice delivers cruel Christmas present to father"

In deciding to prosecute a young person, the Code for Crown Prosecutors is followed in every case. Providing there is sufficient evidence of an offence, the Code requires the prosecutor to consider and weigh up relevant factors to determine whether or not it is in the pubhe interest to prosecute. Where this process involves a young person, the Code requires the prosecutor to specifically consider the interests of the young person involved.

A prosecutor in the Falkland Islands will always consider the interests of the young person in accord-ance with this Code. However, the Code also states that prosecutors should not avoid prosecuting simply because of the defendant's age. Factors such as the seriousness of the offence may outweigh the interests of the young person in being diverted from the court.

It is accepted that the youth justice system in the Falkland Islands is not as well resourced as in the

United Kingdom. For example we do not have the resources available at present to provide a Youth Offending Team. There is therefore room for improvement to the youth justice system, and it will be a decision for councillors whether to give priority to resources and legislation in order to make any improvements to the youth justice system in due course.

However, if the Falkland Islands operated a youth justice system identical to that in the United Kingdom, dependent on the circumstances of the individual, that does not necessarily mean that different prosecution decisions would be made. In addition, our current system is in conformity with the rights of the child and, contrary to the assertion made in the letter, a young person's interests are considered in every case before a decision to prosecute is made.

It should also be noted that the Court will take all relevant factors into account before sentencing, usually after commission of a pre-sentence report prepared by the Probation Officer.

The author of the letter asserts that the relationship with his child has been effectively severed as a consequence of the offence. There is nothing to prevent a parent who lives outside the Falkland Islands from visiting their child in the Falkland Islands.

been able to reply. It would be inappropriate for us to make any further mention on this case while being aware that it is still ongoing and that sentence has not yet been passed on him.


However, we would say that throughout all the time that this case has dragged on, his family have been there to support him all the way.

AG's reasoning raises questions

THE trial of Mr Dave Morris and Mr Jonathan Butler has, as one would expect, generated a lot of discussion and disquiet within the Islands.

People's concerns seem to focus on the amount of money the whole process has cost (as with the Gordon Forbes case, it might be some time until the full cost is revealed) and the fact that the second more serious charge against the two has been dropped.

After the guilty verdict was announced, the editor of the PN raised similar concerns in her editorial. Over the last two weeks the AG has made a forceful rebuttal of these points and tried to explain the processes involved in the case.

It seems to me that the main point she was trying to get across was that, despite the cost, a public trial was essential as the accusations were serious and that the men occupied positions of trust. For this reason she deemed that an internal inquiry was inappropriate as justice had to be seen to be done and that the trial was in the public interest.

I would like readers to compare this approach with what followed a whistle blowing incident in 1997 involving Mr Mike Forrest, the then Director of Public Works who alleged that Mr Mike Summers had signed Mr Stuart Wallace's name on a letter to ARC Southern, leading to an inquiry by the Governor.

As with the charges laid against the police officers, this was a serious accusation. Using the AG's logic I would have expected a full investigation by the police or by a team of experts brought down from the UK. After all, it was most certainly in the public interest. However, what actually happened was the in-quiry was held by the Governor of the day and no action taken as a result.

I believe that both of these cases were equally serious and had huge public implications. As much as I admire Councillor Summers, I cannot but ask why he seems to have been treated so differently to the police officers. Name and address withheld


"As ever, people left their bids until the very last minute, but most people got what they wanted – and many people have paid for experiences that money usually just can't buy."



Simon says: 'Build me a jetty!'

www.newislandtrust.com HOW hard can it be to build a jetty? Just give me some man-power, a cement mixer and a tide chart, and the job will be done, right? Not if the jetty has to be built on New Island!

Roughly 105 tonnes of aggregate, over 100 tractor-loads of rock, a generous serving of cement and some serious man power were needed to tackle the old existing jetty at the bottom of a steep, winding, slippery track with no turn-around space; tides that don't go out far enough; and don't stay out long enough; and wildlife that steals your tools when you're not looking.

Working for Morrison (Falklands) Ltd on a government contract, Mike Moyce and Keith Dickson, led by Simon 'Doy' Francis were the brave and dedicated crew behind the recent construction of a new, extended jetty and slipway on the New Island Reserve.

Jetty construction isn't something that happens every day, and the jetty itself is something that the majority of us probably take for granted. The importance of a good, workable jetty is a fundamental aspect of life in the camp and outer islands.

Building the New Island jetty was no nine to five kind of job (actually more like five to nine), and there wasn't even a pub to relax in come Friday night! To bring some recognition to the hard work of the jetty gang, we diligently recorded their progress (and their challenges!) on camera...


A huge thank you to everyone who was directly, or indirectly, involved with the construction of the jetty, including Byron Marine who instigated the project in the first place.

Arrival: Getting the 'eager beaver' ashore, with no suitable existing slipway in place to receive it, was the first of the challenges that had to be faced.




The Construction Site: Wooden shuttering was put in place around the existing jetty wall to hold the new concrete.

Stanley Common-for the common good?

FALKLAND Islands landowners work hard to protect their areas of rare and important plants and animals to ensure they can be enjoyed by future generations, but with the differing needs of land users in the Falklands, it is often difficult to find the right management approach. This is especially so for Stanley Common. Stanley Common extends east from Tumbledown Mountain to

Stanley Common extends east from Tumbledown Mountain to Cape Pembroke, and south from Murrell River to Eliza Cove. With Stanley in the middle of the Common, but not part of it, the Common is probably the most visited land in the Falkland Islands.

The rugged outcrops, coastlines, and white sandy beaches provide a fantastic recreational area for locals, military personnel, and tourists alike - offering the opportunity to spot wildlife, take some exercise, or simply enjoy a day in the outdoors close to Stanley. A key principle of enjoying 'common' land is respecting other users, meaning that your activities should not negatively impact on those around you

When the road across Stanley Common to Murrell Farm made it easier for anglers to access the Murrell River, Councillors decided to restrict trout fishing to ensure that everybody has the opportunity to benefit from the natural resource.

New legislation was passed in July 2006 making it law that fishing cannot occur on the crossing at the river, or within 100 metres either side of the crossing, and that the daily bag limit is a maximum



of three trout per person (each trout must weigh more than 1.5 lb). Signs were erected by the Environmental Planning Department as a gentle reminder of these new regulations to all users in October. The signs have been locally produced by Marilyn Grimmer of Keilyn Glassware.

At the opposite end of Stanley Common sits Cape Pembroke. Environmental damage from vehicles and litter are the two biggest concerns for this site at present. Councillor Davies, holder of the Environmental portfolio, explains: "Come summer, everyone wants to visit Cape Pembroke, and I would encourage that.

age that. "It's great for picnics, walking and enjoying the wildlife. But ruining the environment by leaving your litter or racing across the dunes and ripping up the vegetation doesn't make any sense."





To encourage more responsible land usage the Environmental Planning Department (EPD) has erected large yellow signs at three key access points to the Cape Pembroke area - Boxer Bridge, Yorke Bay pond, and at the start of the lighthouse track. These signs remind drivers to keep to formed tracks where possible, and drive carefully and slowly to minimise track marks and damage.

Each year the Environmental Committee spends a significant portion of its Environmental Studies Budget on providing a safe path through Gypsy Cove and wardens for busy days to ensure tourists remain within roped areas. This spring additional money was used to build a wooden platform linked to the path, allowing visitors direct views across Yorke Bay without impacting on the environment directly beneath them.

The beautifully crafted wooden structure was built by Justin East of Any Job during November. Interpretive signs produced with material supplied by Ali Liddle of Falklands Conservation were also installed on the viewing platform. Liz Dimmlich of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board (FITB) says that "FITB is committed to developing sustainable tourism sites in the Falklands. Signage, infrastructure and legislation all work towards enriching a visitor's experience, and ensure that the environment is adequately protected so key areas can remain open season after season without disturbing local wildlife or vegetation."

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More active and strategic management of Cape Pembroke is currently being considered by the EPD and FITB. "Guiding more appropriate use will be part of the plan" says Environment Officer, Helen Otley. "Together with FITB, we are looking at the possibility of developing an interpretative trail, to highlight the important wildlife, cultural and recreational values of the area.

the area. "At the end of summer EPD and FITB will look closely at the key issues to determine what the public and users want from these areas, and also explore the best methods for encouraging or enforcing appropriate use of the important areas that exist inside Stanley Common."

Deciding how vehicles should be managed in the Cape Pembroke area will be a key part of the planning process. Many Stanley residents have suggested restricting or banning vehicle access altogether due to the damage they cause. Technically, people found to be destroying land by dirt tracking on Stanley Common could be prosecuted by Government.

"In our small community we shouldn't have to use this approach," Councillor Davies says. "But it's becoming plainly obvious that some people aren't really thinking for the common good. Common Land belongs to all of us and it is the Government's responsibility to protect it on our behalf.

"I've got nothing against mudtracking but the Common is no longer the place to do it – there are just too many vehicles. I think it would be a good idea if those who want to practice 4x4 driving get together and try to identify possible areas which might be suitable.

"The Lands Committee could then consider setting aside an area of land for the sport."



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The tragic tale of the Canache drownings

By Jane Cameron Government Archivist THE letter about the Canache incident by Catherine Switzer, printed in the Penguin News of September 22, contained interesting information about the three young men from Somerset, who were among the eight members of the Falkland Islands Volunteer Force tragically drowned on December 1, 1914.

Walter Shire, James Allen and Herbert Gaylard worked for the Falkland Islands Company at Darwin and were among a number of people from Somerset recruited for the Company by Robert Blake.

Robert Blake had become a director of the FIC after his retirement from farming at Hill Cove in 1898. From his home at South Pethetton in Somerset he helped to recruit labour for the Company, as well as for Hill Cove and for the other Blake family farm at San Julian in Patagonia. In October 1913 he wrote to the Camp Manager at Darwin saying that he hoped, "the six men who are going out for you in the Orcoma will prove....satisfactory." Herbert Gaylard and Walter Shire both started work at Darwin in November 1913, so would have been among this group. James Allen started work in October, so must have travelled on an earlier boat.

Robert Blake in his letter mentions by name only Alfred Hookings, saying that, "...there is no room for him on the Orcoma. so he will go out in November." The farm store books show that he started work at Darwin in December.

On the outbreak of war in August 1914, many men joined the Falkland Islands Volunteer Force (FIVF), including twenty-two of the Darwin gang so the farm was left very short-handed when the Volunteers from Camp were called in to Stanley to help defend the town. Allen, Gaylard and Shires were among those billeted at the Wireless Station to the east of Stanley.

The account of the accident given in Catherine Switzer's letter is slightly misleading in some details (as indeed was the account published in the Falkland Islands Magazine at the time).

The Volunteers in question were working to construct the observation hut on Canopus Hill (which proved invaluable a week later in the Battle of the Falklands) and were returning to the Wireless Station for lunch, using a pontoon or punt, moored at the neck of the Canache, as a short cut. This flat-bottomed craft was hauled across the few yards of water by a circulating rope.

When the men failed to appear for their meal, the NCO on duty at the Wireless Station became concerned and sent an orderly down to the water. He reported on his return that the punt was upside down in the water and that there was no sign of any of the men.

Members of the FIVF and naval divers from HMS Canopus imme-

diately began a search and the bodies of seven of the men were soon recovered.

An inquest was held three days later. It was concluded that the men would have been standing in the punt when, due to a combination of overloading and strong wind and tide conditions, it turned turtle. Most of the men could not swim and all were wearing heavy greatcoats, making even the short distance to the shore impassable.


The funerals took place in Stanley on December 5 and 6. The eighth man was Herbert Gaylard, whose body was not recovered until a few days later. He was buried on December 15, also in Stanley. These details have been gathered from various contemporary documents in the Archives. Unfortunately the full report of the inquest (which may have confirmed that the private who discovered the upturned punt was indeed Alfred Hookings) has not survived. Probably it was lost, as were many other legal records, in the Town Hall fire of 1944.

It is also thought that another of the Volunteers, George Perry, was with the working party on the day of the accident and survived because, knowing how overloaded the pontoon would be, he elected to take the much longer route back to the Wireless Station by walking round the east end of the Canache.

Alfred Hookings stayed in the Falkland Islands, returning to work at Darwin for the remainder of the War. He took up his original profession of baker and married Cecilia Mary Murphy, a widow, at Douglas Station in 1919. She died in 1948 and in 1953 Alfred Hookings, by now living at Darwin once again, left the Falklands for Britain, perhaps to retire to his old home in Somerset.

In the final sentence of her letter Catherine Switzer says the incident "reminds us that the Falkland Islands gave more in the Great War than the name of a naval battle".

In addition to the Volunteers who came forward for the defence of the Islands, those who returned to Britain to enlist and who were subsequently killed in action should also be remembered.

ERECTILE dysfunction means that you cannot get and/or maintain an erection.

In some cases the penis becomes partly erect but not hard enough to have sex properly.

Most men have times when they cannot get an erection, particularly if they are tired, stressed or have drunk too much alcohol However, about 1 in 10 men have persistent or recurring problems. It can occur at any age but becomes more common with increasing age. At least 1 in 5 men in their 70's have persisting problems.

So how does an erection occur normally?

When a man is sexually aroused, messages are transmitted from the brain to the penis. Chemicals called neurotransmitters are released from nerve endings in the penis. Stimulation of the penis also causes release of these chemicals

The neurotransmitters cause the release of another chemical called cGMP which causes the arteries in the penis to widen. This causes extra blood flow to the penis which produces an erection.

cGMP is rapidly broken down into an inactive chemical but if sexual arousal continues then further cGMP is released to maintain the erection. When cGMP levels fall to normal the blood flow in the penis falls to normal and the penis gradually returns to the non-erect state.

So what causes erectile dysfunction?

About 8 in 10 cases are due to physical causes, the remainder are psychological. Physical causes include:

Poor blood flow to the penis due to hardening of the arteries age, high blood pressure, high cholesterol, smoking & diabetes

Diseases of the nervous system - eg: multiple sclerosis, strokes

Diabetes - the commonest cause of ED as it affects both the nerves and the blood vessels

· Side effects of certain medicines - particularly antidepressants and some blood pressure treatments

Alcohol & drug abuse

Hormonal problems - rare

· Damage to the penis or its nerve supply - trauma or surgery

Psychological causes include: Stress

Anxiety · Relationship difficulties

Depression

Typically, ED occurs suddenly if it is a symptom of a mental health problem and may resolve when ones mental health improves. As a rule, mental health causes are more likely to be the cause if there are times when occasionally, one can develop a good erection, even though most of the time you cannot get a good erection.

So what should you do if you develop persistent erectile dysfunction?

Go and see you GP who will discuss the problem, check that you are not taking any medication that could be the cause, do a physical examination and possibly some blood tests to check for some of the causes mentioned above

What treatment is available?

There are four tablets now licensed for treating ED. Three are very similar and work by increasing the quantites of cGMP in the penis: sildenafil (Viagara), taldenafil (Cialis), & vardenafil (Levitra). Of these only sildenafil is stocked in the Falklands. These are taken one hour before you plan to have sex.

Apomorphine (Uprima) works by increasing the level of certain chemicals in the brain which increase sexual arousal.

This is dissolved under the tongue 20 minutes before you plan to have sex. Currently, it is not stocked in the Falklands.

None of these tablets will cause you to have an erection unless you are sexually aroused. They work in most, but not all cases and there are some medical conditions which make treatment with these drugs not appropriate.

There are other treatments available with injections or pellets inserted in the hole in the end of the penis. These sometimes work or are safe to use when the tablets either do not work or are inappropriate.

There are also mechanical devices such as vacuum pumps and rods that can be inserted into the penis surgically.

If the cause of the problem is psychological, then treating the depression, anxiety or stress may cure the problem.

Sometimes counselling or sexual therapy is useful, especially if the problems are either caused by or are causing relationship issues. Sexual therapy can also be useful in managing premature ejaculation.

Sildenafil (Viagara) is available from the pharmacy on prescription only and has to be bought. It currently costs £40 for 8 50mg tablets & £50 for 8 100mg tablets.

Many of you will be aware of adverts on the internet for viagara and similar products.

I would strongly advise people not to purchase from these sources as there are many instances of counterfeit, sub-standard, or even dangerous tablets being marketed.

Fifteen years ago, December 13, 1991 'WHY the Secret?' asks the front page headline of *Penguin News*, referring to Anglo-United's reluctance to allow any prospective local buyers of FIC view the sales prospectus. Even FIDC and FIG were told they would have been sales prospectus. they would have to sign a declaration of confidentiality before being sent a copy. The Government refused to sign. Meanwhile Stuart Wallace of Fortuna was told he would first have to convince Anglo-United he was prepared to make a substantial bid before being sent a prospectus.

FIC Chief Executive Stuart Mosey said the prospectus contained sensitive commercial information that would be of interest to competi-tors. "We must be sure that people are serious." said Mr Mosey.

The SSVC television service is to be extended to Camp to the delight of Campers all over the Islands. Governor Fullerton announced that work on the necessary infrastructure would begin in the summer.

There was a rare occurrence at FIPASS when both British Antarctic Survey vessels were berthed there at the same time. RRS Bransfield was oined by the newly launched James Clark Ross on her maiden voyage. having taken only three weeks to sail from the UK to Stanley.

Ten years ago, November 27, 1996

LOCAL rock band The Fighting Pigs prepare for their first ever foreign tour. Band members Pete King, Len McGill, Gerard Robson and guest vocalist Dave Hall, will fly to Punta Arenas, and on to Santiago, where the band will be playing in three clubs. The Boomerang, Labyrinth and La Fabrica.

A statement issued by the Civil Servants Association dismissed proposals presented by the Hay Management review of terms and condi-tions, and claimed that there, "seems to be little point in any further meetings with the administration until we have the whole Hay Manage-ment package on the table." Chief Executive Andrew Gurr said that he was confident that once details of the individual salary packages were available, employees would become aware that the changes were, "good news.

A meeting at the Community School is addressed by Andrew Gurr, Director of Oil Phyllis Rendell, and John McInnes and Dr Nigel Fannin, both of the British Geological Survey, about the possible future for the oil industry in the Islands. Mrs Rendell told the meeting that at least seven wells are to be drilled in the next five years. After the presentations, various issues were raised in a question and answer session, including what would happen to the local community if oil is discovered.

Mutton Crumble By Frankie Franklin

Filling 1 large or 2 medium onions 750g Mutton/Lamb 2 tsp dried thyme 1 tsp celery salt 1/2 tsp dried/fresh rosemary 1/2 tsp freshly ground black pepper 2-3 tablespoons plain flour 1 pint mutton/lamb stock 2 tablespoons tomato puree Splash or two of Worcestershire sauce

2-3 carrots grated Crumble

400g plain flour

200g butter or margarine (or combination of both) 1/2 tsp dried thyme Good pinch of salt and ground black pepper 75-100g Double Gloucester or Cheshire cheese - grated

SWEAT off onions gently in a large pan or wok in a splash of oil until translucent. Add mince, thyme, celery salt, rosemary and black pepper and cook until the mince is nicely browned. Add flour and stir through.

Keep stirring for about two minutes, ensuring the mince does not stick to the pan. Gently add the stock to the mince, until all stock is used. Add the tomato puree and Worcester sauce, then stir and simmer for about 20-25 minutes.

The mince should be in a medium thick gravy. If too thick, add water or stock. Taste seasoning. Pass the mince through a sieve or fine colander to remove most of the gravy. Reserve gravy. Add the raw grated carrots to the mince and transfer to an oven proof dish, leaving a space of 3-4cm at the top.

Make the crumble by rubbing the butter into the flour until it resembles breadcrumbs. Add the thyme, black pepper and salt, stir. To this stir in the grated cheese. Heap the mix over the mince. Do not compact it.

Place on a baking tray and put into a pre-heated oven 180oC/ 00F/Gas Mark 4 for approximately 30-40 minutes until golden. When cooked, remove, sprinkle with chopped parsley and serve

with set aside gravy, to which a 1/2 tsp of dried mint can be added (optional).

Wool report - week ending December 8 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices oscillated somewhat during last week at sales in Australia, South Africa and New Zealand. Overall however, benchmark prices generally finished the week up in value by between 1 and 11 pence per kilogram clean. The only exceptions to this were the 26 micron fleece wool types which lost 4 pence per kilogram clean. Fine wool lots in South Africa

continue to trade at significant discounts to Australian auction room prices and 24/25 micron fleece wool lots continue to trade at significant premiums over similar micron fleece lots in Australia.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up approximately 1 pence per kilogram at 333.9 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 332.7 pence per kilogram clean.




According to a government press release, it introduces the Islands as "a dynamic UK Overseas Territory" and includes up to date news and contemporary images of the modern Falklands.

Cricket: Forster shines as the Governor's XI take series lead

ISAAC FORSTER, making his debut for the Governor's XI. single-handedly saw off the CBF's XI in the first of this season's three-match series for the South Atlantic Ashes, played on Saturday, December 2, at the MPA Oval

Once the CBF's opening bowlers had exhausted their allotted 8 overs each, the CBF's change bowlers rarely looked like troubling Forster and he hit a total of 20 fours and 5 sixes in his unbeaten 158. The Governor's XI were finally all out for 205 on the very last ball of the innings, with Barrett failing to make his ground attempting a third run

The CBF's openers initially kept themselves close to the required run-rate, before Forster made the breakthrough in the tenth over, trapping Van Zyl leg before. Marlor and Reeves then took up the bowling attack, but Pearce continued to hold out, reaching his half-century, as he batted as impressively as Forster had done earlier.

However, if Forster's batting and dismissal of Van Zyl had not already sealed the CBF's team's fate, the next 15 overs did. As the required run-rate started to soar, the CBF's top- and middle-order fell to Marlor and to Reeves, with Reeves taking the vital wicket of Pearce for 66. Lord Triesman said he was pleased to be able to speak at the Falklands Forum in London in April next year, "...an event which will support your continuing development."

He added a personal note: "May 1 take this opportunity to wish all on the Falklands a very Merry Christmas and a safe and prosperous New Year."

Festive cruise visits

Sunday. The Norwegian Crown will be in Stanley on Boxing Day, carrying 1050 passengers, and the Vistamar (280) will be alongside FIPASS on December 28.

The Aleksey Maryshev (50) will be calling at New Island and Carcass Island on December 29, and then come in to Stanley the following day, joining the Astor, carrying 650 passengers.

rying 650 passengers. The Ushuaia (80) will call at New Island on New Year's Eve, before heading to Saunders Island and Carcass Island on New Year's Day, and Steeple Jason on January 2. Also on January 2, the Molchanov, carrying 80 passengers, will visit New Island and West Point, before heading to Stanley the next day. Lastly, the Clipper Adventurer (122) will be calling at George and Barren Islands, and Bleaker Island on January 4.

Mine feasibility study: '100% clearance is possible'

A TEAM of experts who are in the Falklands to asses the technical and environmental issues surrounding the removing landmines, believe they can totally clear the Islands.

In a public presentation given on Wednesday evening, the team from Crantield University said that while some of the challenges in the Falklands are the worst they have ever seen, they were optimistic about clearance.

Landmine consultant Paddy Blagden said humanitarian clearance standards are higher than military standards: they work "slowly and carefully" he said, "and we obey a very precise set of rules," allowing fields to be cleared completely.

In their three weeks in the Islands, the team have visited 103 minefields. When asked if he would take his children into a cleared area, Mr Blagden's response was a resounding "yes", adding that, as an evaluator, he spends a lot of time in minefields while clearance work goes on.

However, it's not all plain sailing. Mr Blagden said some areas in the Falklands look "fairly tricky", others look "difficult" and others still "are frightful".

He said the fields at Yorke Bay

were an example of the final category. He outlined the methods that might be used for clearance which include ground penetration radar, metal detectors, dogs trained in detection, and removal using heavy machinery.

A member of the public asked whether there would be problems with movement of mines buried in peat. Soils consultant Rodney Burton said tests were being carried out to look at whether mines do actually move in peat; the fact that peat can be easily damaged is also being addressed, he said, and trials on how to take remedial action are being conducted. Mr Blagden also assured that environmental agencies would be involved in any clearance.

As to how mines react in sand, Mr Blagden said that if they are not heavy they can move in sea sand with the tide. However, he added that the Falklands have a low tidal reach without strong currents so they may not have moved much.

Mr Blagden was clear that the team were not in the Falklands to discuss strategic policy and whether clearance will happen. However a small number of people at the meeting expressed the view that the minefields should be left alone.

Chief of Police officially resigns

SUPERINTENDENT Dave Morris has tendered his resignation as Chief Police Officer.

This now clears the way for the process to recruit a successor to begin. Applications will be invited locally and in the UK early in the New Year.

On November 9. Mr Morris was convicted of doing an act tending and intended to pervert the course of public justice.

Regrettably, he was taken ill later that day and has since been in hospital. Accordingly, sentence has not been delivered and Mr Morris has remained suspended from duty, without pay.

out pay. Penguin News asked Chief Executive Chris Simpkins why Mr Morris was able to resign after being found guilty of a crime and was not simply dismissed from office.

He replied. "I can well understand the confusion. There is, as you would expect, the ability to dismiss in the event of a criminal conviction within the terms of the Management Code. However, whilst the procedure to be followed is quite straightforward, and therefore not as complicated as for a disciplinary offence under the Code, it nevertheless requires the individual to be able to understand and participate in the process."

Given Mr Morris's current incapacity, Mr Simpkins said, the government sought medical opinion as to his fitness to undergo the procedure. "We were clearly advised that he was, and is not, fit to participate in the process. We were therefore awaiting medical clearance before commencing the procedure when the resignation was received." He added, "I would emphasise,

He added, "I would emphasise, lest anyone imagines otherwise, that no pressure whatsoever has been applied to secure a resignation."

Men lost after ship sinks

AT least four crew are believed to have died in the sinking of a Korean trawler in the South Atlantic.

The *In Stang* 207, which has formerly fished for skate in the Falklands, is reported to have sunk 366 miles north of Cape Dolphin, 166 miles from the Falklands Outer Conservation Zone.

John Pollard from the In Sung Corporation's Falklands agents, Sulivan Shipping, said another ship from the fleet, the *In Sung 2* transhipped in the Islands yesterday: "They were keen to get the job done as they wanted to join in the search."

Roy Summers from the Fisheries Department said no vessels had been specifically dispatched from here to the scene: "We know there are at least 33 other ships in the area and it would take at least a day for ships to get there from here." *PN/MP*

A NEW bridge now sits over the Malo river on East Falkland. The old bridge had to be re-

placed after the culverts underneath deteriorated into a dangerous condition.

The bridge was supplied by the Acrow Corporation in the US and shipped to the Falklands by SAAS in two forty-foot containers.

Concrete abutments were put into place in late November and, once they had gained sufficient strength, work started on the bridge proper.

bridge proper. The construction took a little over one day on a hardstand to the south of the river, then the whole affair was pushed across the river using a bulldozer. Roads Engineer Bob Hancox said

the operation was a great success, "__due in part to the simplicity of the bridge type but mainly through great team work."

The gang was lead by Nunker Summers and included Ian McLeod, Steve Jennings, Ali Bonner, Graham Morrison and Joe Newell. Technical assistance was provided by Chris Davies. Ross Chaloner and Patsy Robson.

The bridge will be open for the Christmas break with temporary approach ramps, the final earthworks will be carried out in the New Year.

Constitution discussed at public meeting

A SECOND public meeting on the review of the Constitution, focusing on the structure of government, took place on Tuesday evening

The meeting attracted around 15 members of the public, much improved on the week before when only four attended.

In a presentation to the meeting, Chair of the Select Committee on the Constitution, Councillor Mike Summers, outlined the key elements the Select Committee had agreed should be considered in the review. These included maximum self-governance, having Executive Council as the most senior government body, greater openness in government, having members more accountable and responsible for decisions and actions through the development of the portfolio system and ensuring sufficient scrutiny of the system.

ance to give their views on how many members should comprise ExCo, whether councillors should be full time and fully paid, how the portfolio structure should work and the role of advisory groups and lay members on committees. The Select Committee currently favours retaining a three member ExCo with non-ExCo members holding portfolio responsibility.

At the request of members of the public at Tuesday's meeting, another meeting will be scheduled in January during which the entire Constitutional review will be summarised.

Following discussion at the meeting on how many ExCo papers were published and therefore whether that business could be conducted in public, Gilbert House has revealed that in 2006, out of a total of 315 ExCo papers, 136 were published, which is 43% of the total.

Falklands Radio announces festive programme change

THERE will be a number of changes to the programming on Falklands Radio during the festive season.

Christmas Day programmes will get underway at 10am, rather than 7am. Liz and Jock Elliot will be in the studio until 1pm with their Christmas morning show, including festive requests and dedications.

There will also be no Breakfast Show or Morning Experience on New Year's Day, however both of those shows will run as usual for the rest of the holiday season. There will be no News Direct on Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day.

Station Manager Corina Bishop said programming on Boxing Day and December 27 will include coverage of the Stanley Sports Association's race meeting with commentary provided by Patrick Watts. "During those days the station will be staying on air throughout the afternoon and the commentary will be repeated during those evenings."

She added, "If you wish to have your announcements, job vacancies or what's on guide notices included during the week December 25 to January I, they need to be at the station by 3pm on Friday, December 22 (today)."

Any further programme changes will be announced on Falklands Radio.

School managers critical of proposal handling

COUNCILLORS have said that the proposals for restructuring the Education Department are still in the consultative phase with Councillor Robertson insisting. "there is no fait accomplichere"

"there is no fait accompli here." Mrs Robertson was responding to questions which emerged at a lively meeting of the Board of Education on Tuesday, when board member Barry Elsby presented a letter signed by himself and fellow school manager John Clifford, criticising the proposed restructuring.

The letter, which is printed on page 7 and which claims to have the support of the majority of the Community School managers, outlines the "grave concerns" the managers have about the proposal, and the way it was introduced. It questions where the draft plan actually came from, given that the Board of Education was not involved at all, with some members of the board only learning of the proposal when it was printed in *Penguin News* in September.

The letter calls for the whole process to be halted immediately while a thorough review is undertaken.

At the meeting, Mr Elsby questioned the way the proposal had been formulated saying that he found it, "an insult," that such a major restructuring proposal had not even been mentioned to the board.

Cllr Robertson explained that the proposal's genesis was a meeting held between herself, Cllr Stevens and Cllr Andrea Clausen, and Director of Education, Barbara Booth, soon after she had taken up her post.

Responding to the criticism, Chairman of the Education Board, Cllr Richard Stevens said, "In hindsight, we probably agree that it wasn't handled perfectly." He went on to say that since the scheme had been announced, he and Cllr Robertson had done a lot of work, including meeting with teachers, "to have a debate." He added that any way change was introduced would be a problem: "It's never going to suit everybody."

In response to Mr Elsby's claim that councillors were trying to "railroad" the proposals through, Cllr Robertson said that the first proposal was the first stage of consultation, "and far from the last." Cllr Stevens concurred. "It should be made very clear," he said, "that it's not going to be forced through."

The managers' letter is also critical of Mrs Booth, and claims that when Community School Headteacher David Higgins asked for a meeting with councillors on behalf of teachers to discuss the proposal while Mrs Booth was absent from the Islands, she rebuked Mr Higgins, and told him to "follow the government line."

When questioned about this at the meeting by Mr Elsby, Mrs Booth admitted that, "that was my phrase," but said, "there was a misunderstanding of semantics," claiming that what she meant by "the government line," was that the process was still in consultation.

Mr Elsby called for a board meeting to be held with the headteachers and the school managers to be present to discuss the proposal. Clir Stevens agreed to this, with the meeting scheduled to take place on February 6.

Chichester outreach

The meeting also heard from the Director that it is anticipated that two representatives from Chichester College will visit the Falklands in February or March 2007, to progress the establishment of an outreach centre for the college in the Islands.

With regard to Falkland Island students studying overseas, Mrs Booth said that all the reports received were positive, and made special mention of Sam Cockwell, who has received an award at the end of his first year from the University of Manchester for being one of the top three students with the highest results for the year.

Shortage of new potatoes this Christmas

A STAPLE at this time of year, new potatoes may be tough to get in Stanley due to a crop failure at the market garden.

Tim Miller of Stanley Growers says both the company's polytunnels of Christmas potatoes failed due to the extreme wet ground conditions from the wet winter and wetter spring.

"We had a lot of trouble this season finding dry tunnels to plant - hence a lot of crops are late. We left the Christmas potatoes as late as possible and planted up when it looked as if the ground was drying out - but it then rained again for several more weeks. Although the tunnels have outside drainage, the ground was just so wet and cold that the seed just rotted in the soil."

Tim says he has never known this to happen before nor has he seen such a wet winter and spring. Later planted potatoes are "doing fine".

This is bad news for Stanley Growers as it means the business loses a lot of vital cash sales at this time of year and their customers are being tet down. However, he adds, "The good news is that the Head of the Bay was not so wet and we will have Ted Jones's crop in to sell, plus we have just imported 500kg of baby new potatoes from Uruguay - not quite as good as little bennies but better than nothing!"

Weather wise this season is one of extremes, Tim says: "The wettest winter and spring delayed all field works and now we have the start of a record dry summer and frequently having to ridge up potatoes to by and keep the soil over them before it all blows away."

The sunshine has helped the greenhouses he says, and after a late start they now have high yields of salads, however the business continues to suffer from the loss of most of the cruise ship market due to the charter flights ban.

"Vessels normally restore in the port where they do their passenger exchange, and there is no way we can compete with Ushuaia prices of about 60% below our basic growing costs; some vessels will pay a premium for our quality but not that much."

Attorney General's resignation sparks rumours

FOLLOWING the news last week of the resignation of the Attorney General, Melanie Chilton, a number of rumours have spread about the reason she is to leave.

Chief Executive Chris Simpkins last week said she was resigning, "...for family health reasons."

While not wishing to comment on any specific rumour, Councillor Richard Davies told *Penguin News* that he had ascertained that no evidence has been presented to the government that warrants investigation.

He commented, "If anyone does have evidence of wrongdoing, they should put it before the appropriate person. If they don't have evidence, they should think twice about spreading unfounded rumours which cause unnecessary distress."

It is not known when Mrs Chilton will be leaving the Islands; Principal Crown Counsel, Ros Cheek, has been sworn in as Acting Attorney General for the time being.

Strong winds hammer Islands but cause little damage

THE Falklands were battered by strong winds at the weekend but surprisingly little damage was caused.

Acting Principal Met Officer, Matt Jolley said the highest wind speed at Mount Pleasant was 52 knots at around 6am, with the highest gust, 64 knots, recorded at 5.47am.

However he added, "We have some wind measuring instruments on the highest ground around the Falklands, and Mt Kent scored the highest with a mean speed of 68 knots and a gust of 86 knots." The Fire Service were called out

a number of times on Saturday night to secure buildings and give assistance, and the Director of Public Works said there were a couple of power outages arising from the wind, one on Kent Road and another on Dairy Paddock Road.

Assault in pub results in £175 penalty

RICHARD BONNER of Stanley was convicted of common assault in court on Monday.

Mr Bonner pleaded guilty to the charge which followed an incident in Deano's Bar on October 7, and also involved Scott Henry-Roberts and John Henry.

Ms Ros Cheek prosecuting told the court that Mr Bonner's account of events differed to that of Mr Henry-Roberts, but that Mr Bonner had grabbed Mr Henry-Roberts by the throat before he was pulled off and eventually ejected from the bar by the owner.

Mr Bonner apologised to the court for his behaviour and said his actions were, "totally out of character."

Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds, said she had noted Mr Bonner's apology and that the incident was, "not a serious assault," but added, "it is something that shouldn't have happened." She fined Mr Bonner £175 and ordered him to pay £70 prosecution costs.

Mr Henry-Roberts and Mr Henry have also been charged with common assault in relation to the same incident. Their cases have been adjourned until their defence solicitor returns to the Islands in January.

Driving offences Mr Cesar Esteban Marillican

who has been charged with driving without insurance, driving without due care and attention, driving without a driving licence, and taking a vehicle without consent, also had his case adjourned until January when his legal representative will return to the Falklands.

Youth Court

A 17 year old youth has admitted a charge of burglary. The boy, who appeared in court on Thursday, admitted breaking into a storeroom of a retail outlet and stealing a bottle of vodka earlier this year.

His defence counsel, Alison Inglis said the boy had made a serious error of judgement and apologised for his actions which had led to a breakdown in the relationship he had with his extended family.

The Senior Magistrate said she was concerned by the breach of trust the youth's actions had caused and fined him £300.

New CBF impressed by 'confident' Islands

THE new Commander of British Forces has been officially sworn onto Legislative Council.

Brigadier Nick Davies took the oath of allegiance in front of Members and Acting Attorney General, Ros Cheek.

All the councillors used their speeches to the motion for adjournment to welcome Brigadier Davies to the meeting.

He responded saying it was a "privilege" to command British Forces in the South Atlantic Islands and to attend Legislative Council. He commented, "I am struck by

thinking and with a notable spirit." Brigadier Davies said his priority

"the delivery of hard edged military capability to ensure security of the Islands" but added that in doing so he looks forward to, "...working closely with the Falkland Islands Government, your own Defence Force and also the people of the Islands.

He added, "I would like to personally reassure you of my complete commitment both to ensuring the Falklands can prosper without foreign military interference but also in ensuring, as much as possible, it is to the benefit of the community as a whole.

Islanders at home are best ambassadors

INTERNATIONAL ignorance about the Falkland Islands is something we have to tackle, Councillor Davies has said.

In his motion for adjournment speech he said that on recent trips abroad he had been struck by the ignorance of, "the reality of the Falkland Islands, our rights and our way of life ..

He said that the most valuable tool for "selling" the Islands abroad is, " ...the impression that visitors get when they come here and see the reality for themselves.

"They see for themselves that Falkland Islanders are a self-sufficient, self-governing community with a long history of settlement and development of their homeland. It is the Falkland Islanders here who are the best ambassadors for their country abroad."

He said this first hand look at the Islands, "makes it very hard for them. whatever their political views, to deny that we have rights to govern ourselves peacefully and democratically without external interference or hostility.

Also of importance, Cllr Davies said, is the steps the Islands have taken on environmental issues: "We've signed up to the Kyoto Protocol, we've hosted a workshop on albatross and petrel conservation, we've contributed to the climate change debate at the EU's Overseas Territories forum and for a long time the FOCZ has been a dolphin and whale sanctuary.

He told Legislative Council, "I recently had a letter from the UK's IWC commissioner congratulating the Falkland Islands people and government on their strong stance against commercial whal-

ing. "Not only are these the right things to do but they do raise our international profile and show us to be a responsible part of the international community. I think that's a very important thing to do and to continue doing.

Report into *Holberg* grounding needed

THOROUGH report into the grounding of the *Holberg* is necessary, Cllr Clausen has said, as, "...there are clearly a number of areas that need addressing and lessons learned.

However, she added, this should not happen yet. "We don't get into that now, before we have reached what we could call an appropriate conclusion to this incident.

IIr Stevens also commented on the Holberg in his speech to the motion for adjournment He said, "It beggars belief how a large vessel was that close to terra firma... if it was a whale you'd think there was something wrong with it.

The Director of Fisheries this week provided an update on the Holberg's situation. He said the Mariana Rojamar II

arrived early on Friday, December 15 to commence operations to remove oil from the ship. A boat with a precision sounder was used to determine the bottom topography in the vicinity of the Holberg. "Later in the day the Mariana Rojamar II was moored on a four point mooring about 120 metres from the Holberg, "Mr Barton said. On Saturday, divers started remov-

ing debris from the port side of the ship including two trawls.

Executive Council news

Budget framework approved

"A SIGNIFICANT step in the evolution of internal selfgovernment in the Falkland Islands" took place this month.

The Executive Council summary will no longer be presented by the Governor, but will be presented for the first time by a democratically elected member of the government.

There are three members of Executive Council who are elected from the Legislature, and Councillor Andrea Clausen will be presenting the Executive Council summary.

She began this month by reporting on Executive Council's approval of the 2007/08 Budget Strategy Framework, based on a scenario of gradual improvement in Illex revenues (as has been the case over recent years).

Key recommendations, she said, include: "maintaining a balanced budget; meeting inflation including pay awards by efficiency savings and reductions in discretionary expenditures: limiting the transfer budget to £5m; continuing to develop the user pays principle: limiting the net capital expenditure to £12m in any 3 year rolling period and maintaining our net liquid assets at 2.5 times the operating budget."

Clir Clausen said that Executive Council further requested that officers examine a number of areas:

 user pays, in particular to look at how many schemes we currently have, how many more there potentially are and how these schemes affect the lower income sectors of our community;
 2) the possibility of treating

2) the possibility of treating Illex income as a windfall, in particular to look at setting revenue at a realistic fixed level for future years and treat any revenue over and above that amount as windfall;

3) to consider incentive schemes to improve efficiencies, not necessarily as performance pay.

FLH subsidy requirement 'less than forecast'

AN information paper on the Falkland Landholdings Recovery Plan was received.

Following a workshop in September, Cllr Clausen said, the FLH Board made the following conclusions:

1) to reduce the number of animals supplied to the abattoir to 12,000 (6,000 lambs and 6,000 weathers) over the next 3 years;

2) breeding ewes need to increase by at least 10,000 over the same period which in turn would allow the flock to increase by 20,000 sheep to maintain wool income; 3) to supplement 3,800 ewes and 6,000 ewe hoggets with both swede and by-pass protein in order to meet objective 2). "It is estimated that the cost of

"It is estimated that the cost of providing the fodder crop and bypass protein will be met by the cash benefit and so this exercise will be cost neutral."

More generally, Cllr Clausen said, "it was noted that whilst FLH still require a subsidy, it is slightly less than that originally forecast and will be required at a different stage in the plan."

Planning permission given for 'green space' building

EXECUTIVE Council has supported a decision by the Planning and Building Committee to grant planning permission for the erection of a dwelling at 2 Goss Road. Stanley.

Cllr Clausen explained, "This permission, whilst complying with Development Controls (D2) within the Stanley Town Plan, actually falls outside those under Green Space Provision (H12).

"However, this is relatively small and is physically separated from the main green space, and so the decision was taken to allow this 'departure application'." Executive Council also agreed to apply only the directly attributable supervisory costs to the construction of the road to Mount Alice, rather than the standard 33% overhead (this was considered an appropriate further commitment to reducing MOD defence costs).

Clīr Clausen said she and her colleagues had previously agreed to adapt the Camp road building programme to accommodate the construction of roads to both Mt Alice and Byron in order that the MOD can effectively utilise the new cross sound ferry when it comes into service in 2007.

Shipping contract signed but still work to do

THE signing of the contract with Workboat Services Ltd for the new coastal shipping service has officially been approved by Executive Council.

Clir Mike Rendell said that the new vessel - "aptly named Concordia Bay" - should arrive here in June next year.

He described this as a "significant step forward" but added that there are a number of infrastuctural issues to be resolved in the coming months.

"No decision has been taken on the detailed proposals of where the ferry head will be at Port Howard or at Newhaven, or for that matter, the construction details. The most important factor is to get it right and that might take a little longer yet." Clir Rendell said that as there is a

Cllr Hansen's praise for stretched FIGAS team

THE staff of the government's Air Service (FIGAS) have been praised for their extra work during this busy time of year.

Cllr Ian Hansen said the FIGAS team are even busier than usual following the accident on West Point Island in November which led to the loss of an airframe.

He commented, "I think it speaks volumes for the hard work and efficiency of FIGAS that no one, to my knowledge, has complained about a lack of effectiveness that this incident had on the service provided.

"I think this is a huge compliment to FIGAS staff - the administration, the pilots, the engineers and the fire service - in the way they've coped with the situation."

He said that with one less airframe, the difficulties will continue, "...and I believe we must ensure the service doesn't suffer any longer than is necessary."

New RIC already on patrol in the Falklands



School managers' concern at Education proposals

THE elected Managers of the Community School recently met with the headmaster, Mr David Higgins, and some of the senior teachers to discuss the proposed reorganisation of the Education Department.

That meeting confirmed our grave concerns regarding the proposal, the way it was introduced and the serious effect this is having on morale in the Community School.

Despite this meeting it remains unclear as to who decided that this complete reorganisation was required; was it the Director of Education's idea or was she merely carrying out the orders of Councillors or the Chief Executive?

It is clear that no one within the Department was consulted about the need for change or how best to go forward. Indeed, Mr David Higgins only learned about the plan two days before it was published in The other heads and teachthe PN ing staff were told the day before.

The elected Managers from all schools learned of the proposal in the PN but perhaps more worryingly, this proposal was never discussed at the Board of Education.

It is unprecedented that a paper of such importance should be publicised or sent to ExCo without it first coming to the Board for discussion and approval. Whilst it might be possible for the Director to by-pass the Board, it begs the question, why?

What was being hidden? Was it her idea to do this or did others instruct her to ignore the Board and heads?

The consultation document released to the public, A Learning Campus, was vague in the extreme as to why such drastic change was thought necessary. A document given to members of staff by the Director did give some reasons. Under the heading Areas of Con-cern from Councillors and the General Public, six points are given:

1) Lack of career structure,

2) Insufficient provision of adult education.

3) Dissonance between working hours and school opening hours 4) Lunch time options

6) Disaffection with the training unit (subject to a separate review).

A number of professional perspective points were also given but nowhere in this or any document we have seen has evidence been given to back up these points.

Some of these points, such as 3 and 4 above, border on the point of farce when one considers that these are used to explain the need for a total reorganisation of the Education Deparment

Teachers and support staff from all schools produced a joint response to the papers. It was a well argued critique of the proposal, supporting points that had merit but rightly asking for evidence to backup other assertions of weakness.

They went on to point out that the proposed restructuring would address only a couple of the alleged weaknesses.

A series of documents went back and to between the Director and Community School teachers and learning support staff.

In the last one dated December 4, 2006 the Director proposed a modified structure which takes account of suggestions from both staff and the General Public and goes on to say that, at a glance this might appear to be overly expensive and I will ask HR to undertake a rough costing.

This is the first and only time that the cost of this planned reorganisation is mentioned, either in public documents or those sent to teachers. What is the cost of the proposed reorganisation?

Teachers at the Community School were so concerned that matters would be decided by ExCo before a full discussion had taken place that, via Mr David Higgins, they asked for a meeting with councillors responsible for the Education Department. (They asked for this as the Director was out of the Islands and would not return before the majority of teachers had left on holiday at the end of term.)

He quite rightly agreed to this suggestion and notified the Director who was in the UK at the time.

This caused some concern and the Chief Executive felt it necessary to attending the meeting as welĺ

We gather from another source that before the meeting Mr Higgins received a rebuke from the Director (not personally, but via someone in the Education office) that he was to 'follow the Government line

This unprofessional approach to senior members of staff was not confined to Mr Higgins.

In the proposed restructuring, as published in the PN, it was clear that a post currently held by a senior member of the Training Dept was to be removed and replaced with a different post. This person was out of the Islands at the time. One of the heads made repeated requests of the Director that she contact this person (her husband was in the Islands at the time and would have contact details) before publication.

Allegedly, this did not happen and the member of staff learned of the proposed removal of her post from the PN. If true, this was obviously a calculated insult to the member of staff and something that a professional such as the Director should be ashamed of.

It is clear to us that teachers. learning support staff and school Heads are extremely concerned and

upset by this proposed restructur-ing and the insensitive way it has been handled.

As Mr Higgins said in our meeting, morale at the Community school had already suffered due to the departure of Mr Purvis and the way he had been treated. However, morale had improved this term but the way this proposed restructuring has been handled has made things far far worse.

He was clearly very distressed at the effect this was having on his staff and we all formed the opinion that had he known this process would be handled so badly, he would not have accepted the job.

The elected non-teaching pa-rental representatives of the Community School Managers and myself as the elected member on the Board of Education call for this restructuring exercise to be halted immediately whilst a total review of the Department takes place and weaknesses identified.


If, after some months of reflection, it is decided that changes are required, we ask that this proceed in an inclusive manner, drawing on all the expertise within the department.

From butcher to businessman: Laurie Butler

By Sharon Jaffray IN 1956 Laurie Butler had just left the British Army after three years and was working on farms in the UK for just £16 a month.

He spotted adverts in the Farmers Stockbreeder looking for workers in Australia and the Falklands and thought that either would suit him fine. His mother pleaded with him not to go to Australia - her brother had gone there and was never heard from again and she feared the same would happen with her son - the Falklands were the safe option.

And so it was that on December 21 of that year, 23 year old Laurie stepped from the *Fitzroy* on to Falklands soil. While his mother's fears were not realised and he did keep in touch, it was some 29 years before he ever left the country that has become his home and that has given him what he describes as, "the best years" of his life.

Working on farms had given him valuable experience with horses and cattle, and he was familiar with sheep and dogs so, unlike many who came to the Islands answering adverts for work, he was not to find the hurly burly lifestyle of an outside shepherd too much of a culture shock.

Just as well really, as when he arrived at Port Howard where he was employed at a rate of £26 a month (paid every six months), the settlement was deserted apart from Victor Summers, the general foreman, who said that everyone else was at a barbecue at Purvis Pond and they would not be able to go as it was only accessible by horse. "Not a problem." said Laurie, "I can ride a horse, let's go."

As they reached Fox Pass Victor offered a bottle of whisky to Laurie and this, he said was his first ever tot straight out of the bottle, "...but not my last," he added.

After a few months of settlement work. White Rock became Laurie's home for the next 18 months as he worked as an outside shepherd, sharing the house and the work with Jimmy Miller. Who was to do the cooking did not cause any arguments - the stove was broken so the undomesticated pair purchased a case of Scotch Broth and ate nothing else for more than a week. Roddy Martin was to later join him at White Rock. "For my single years they were the best 18 months of my life." enthused Laurie who spent his days out

Of course life is never a bed of roses and on one occasion Laurie got caught out in the snow at Jersey Harbour. Suffering from the cold he made his way back to the house. thinking of the roaring fire in the open grate that Jimmy would doubtless have stoked up. Arriving at the house he was welcomed by accordion music... and an empty grate. Jimmy was sitting on the sofa making music totally oblivious to his housemate's dilemma. "It didn't go

down too well." said Laurie. On another occasion, the annual event of swimming horses onto River Island using a rowing boat almost ended in disaster when they grounded on a sandbank: a stallion that was being led from the boat got his feet on the bottom and decided he was going back the way he had come, at speed, towing the small boat with Claude Molkenbuhr, Hector Barnes, Arthur Lamosa, Sid Lee and Laurie on board backwards.

Arthur turned to Laurie and asked, "can you swim chay?" It turned out that as was often the case. none of the other men could swim and Laurie assured them that although he could, he, "could only swim for one."

With the horse under control once it was again out of its depth and swimming, Laurie said he was struck by the realisation that they had been in a potentially serious situation, however no-one treated it as such, it was just part of the job.

Laurie moved back into Port Howard settlement for four months around August 1959, but was soon on his way to East Falkland. "I had a difference of opinion with the boss and we agreed that he would continue his work as manager and I'd go to town," Laurie said with a grin.

Turning to with the Falkland Islands Government in the Public works Department (PWD) Laurie found himself at Ajax Bay dismantling the generators at the disused canning factory with Gerald Cheek and Ted Guthridge for a month. The generators were brought to Stanley and used at the power station.

The next job was peat cutting on contract for government for 1/6d (7½p) per yard. Laurie said he would cut about 40 yards a day throughout the season. "There were a lot of men who cut more than me from day to day, but not many who did it for the entire season."

In the winter, work was started on grading and tarmaccing the roads, again on contract. At the time, regular PWD employees were being paid about £6 per week, however working on the road from 6am to 6pm Laurie was pleased to be earning £14 per week. He recalled some of his workmates as Olaf Berntsen, Melvin Turner and Peter McGill (who managed to set fire to the tarmac machine).

The rock supply was at Moody Brook and the men quarried with crow bars, sledge hammers, picks and wheel barrows. (These roads withstood Stanley's light traffic until 1982 when the heavy and tracked vehicles the Argentines used in town took their toll and they started to break up).

Laurie started going out with his future wife Lani (Halliday) towards the end of 1959 and they married in December 1960. Their children Susie, Margaret, Sheila and Jonathan were born in 1962, 1967, 1969 and 1971 respectively and have all made their lives in the Falklands.

A career change found Laurie working in the general store Macnatasney's and in 1963 he was offered a job with the FIC Butchery. This was to be a major turning point: after four years he became manager and later bought the business.

In 1982 Laurie and Lani bought the butchery from the FIC, "...it took every penny we had," he said, and the first month it was a matter of waiting for everyone to settle their accounts. Throughout the years bad debtors were a rarity, "bad payers were always people that could well afford to pay," said Laurie who added that big families on low wages would always be the first to settle their accounts.

With a contract established with the MoD, about 11,000 sheep per year were slaughtered - before 1982 about 200 sheep a week supplied the town, with 300 cattle per year meeting the demand for beef.

There were no roads for sheep to be hauled to the butchery door so it was a case of saddling up the horse and driving them with dogs from the farm.

Laurie kept and bred horses and employed the help of local drovers and friends such as Neil and Paul Watson and Ray Robson.

Laurie was a familiar sight around Stanley delivering mutton and beef to each household from the back of a Land Rover, weighing the quarters before putting them in the meathouse each hone had purposely built. His uniform was his black beret and his turned down wellie boots.

Orders for meat were placed in different ways: the most common was to put a sign in the porch window asking for a "hind" or "fore" quarter. Often people would simply see Laurie on the street and ask for their preferred cut. It was a source of pride for the local butcher that he never forgot the orders stored away in his head from week to week.

One morning as Laurie made his way to work at 6am on a lovely bright spring September morning he found a man lying out near an old trailer on Dairy Paddock Road. He and his work mate stopped to investigate and thought the man, who they identified as Ernie 'Grabs' Gleadell, was dead. They contacted the police and soon Terry Peck was on the scene and also being unable to find a pulse, confirmed their fears.

Finding some sheets of hessian they wrapped the body and bundled it into the butchery van. (Laurie assures me there was no mutton awaiting delivery although a more pernickety member of the public refused to have her meat delivered for some time afterwards.) As they went to shift Ernie, Laurie saw his hand move and drew attention to it, but still no pulse was discernible.

At the hospital the doctor confirmed that there was no pulse and said to take him to the mortuary. Again as they were about to move him Laurie noticed a slight movement in his hand and it was decided that they should put him in a ward. Sixteen hours later Ernie had a steady pulse, but when told that Laurie had possibly saved his life, he suggested he should have, "minded his own bloody business."

The winter Laurie's youngest daughter Sheila was born (1969) the snow was so deep it completely covered the corrals and pens at the butchery. Trenches had to be dug to get the sheep into the butchery but the town had their meat delivered.

Laurie recalled that the NP8901 Royal Marines garrisoned at Moody Brook came into the town each day and dug out the old age pensioner's peat sheds and ensured that they had a supply of dry peat for the stoves that provided heating and cooking facilities.

With a back problem getting worse, in 1988 Laurie decided to sell the butchery; the heavy work was not doing him any good, and wool prices were less steady than in the past. (The price of mutton was about 6d (approx 2 and a half pence new) in 1965 and had risen to 18p per pound in 1988).

The wool, a valuable 'by-product', had been Laurie's 'wage' from the butchery. What remained from wool sale income after any capital expenses he would attempt to invest outside the Islands. "I knew I was getting up the tree a bit so I bought insurance policies and that sort of thing and no pensions here

other than old age pension. We lived well, the kids were well clothed and fed but we did not live outside our means."

So, having lived and worked in what are occasionally referred to as 'the good old days' before 1982 what was Laurie's favourite aspect of that lifestyle?

lifestyle? "The best thing is that we all knew one another, warts and all," Laurie promptly replied.

"I made friends on the first day I arrived at Port Howard, Owen and Mike Summers. Alanna Morris, Melody Fiddes and James Lee were there; then there is Neil Watson, Ted Jones, Ray Robson, Peter Goss and so many other people I've known for so many years - they were my friends then and they are my friends now. There is not one of them that I've agreed with all the time, but we have never had a permanent fall out.

"It was a fantastic lifestyle. Although we might have heard of people being poor, it was only financially, not spiritually. Wherever you went there was someone that would help you - if you got stuck on the track there was always someone who would help, turn up with a bottle and share it "

Laurie admits he didn't much care for farm managers however, "they thought they were a bit better than everyone else," he said

With the butchery years behind him it was back to PWD for a year. However, one day when looking at a Greek reefer with a Russian trawler on either side of it in Port William, someone made the observation that there was approximately £5million worth of fish on board. "I've got to

get some of that," thought Laurie and so the seed for his most lucrative business venture to date, was sown.

In 1988, with his long term friends Rob Pitaluga and Des King they approached a colleague of Rob's, lan Thomson, and consequently formed the company Argos Ltd.

In the first year they chartered a couple of trawlers and "did pretty well." However the following year disaster struck when there was a fire on board one of the ships and two local firemen tragically died.

The company had also had a bad year financially; they had lost a lot of money and it was time for a rethink. In 1990 Laurie became General Manager of Argos Ltd and a new joint venture with Pereira, a Spanish fishing company, was formed. Over the years they have moved into buying shares in the vessels and now, with the introduction of the new fishing policy, have formed Argos Group Ltd. owned equally between Laurie. Rob and Des. This company owns trawlers and is not to be confused with Argos Georgia which owns longliners registered in St Helena.

Argos Georgia was formed in 1996 and great improvements have taken place on the longliners. It is a source of some pride that the Argos*Helena* is possibly one of the best equipped longliners in the world with every individual fish caught being traceable to the market place. "The fishing policy took a long time to come and a lot of people did not like it, but, it will certainly bring a lot of money into the Falklands," said Laurie.

"Some questioned that it was for a few people but it was the same for the farms when they were subdivided. Only a certain amount of people can farm - some may try and jump on the band wagon when it goes well but when the chips are down you are on your own - that's business."

Laurie is a successful businessman but also one with simple needs and strong values - his family and friends are paramount in his life.

"My wife and kids will back me up when I tell you that I actually preferred life before 1982 - before then I trusted 90% of the population and I knew the other 10%. Now, I don't know half and trust no more that 25% - most of whom I've known for many years - I'm not a great lover of newcomers.

"I'm better off than I used to be, but I don't feel any different - I don't think I've changed, do you?" asked Laurie.

Personally, 1 think he would be perfectly happy driving the streets of Stanley or riding the hills with a drove of sheep, chatting to his customers and weighing out quarters of mutton - we just need to dig out that regulation beret and those turned down wellie boots for him.

Laurie celebrated his 50 years in the Falklands in style last night with a meal and drinks for more than 70 family and friends at the Malvina House

Q IS IT true that government is planning to build houses east of the Chandlery on the land where there is a well where there is a well established area of trees? If so, why?

A Councillor Richard Davies. holder of the housing portfolio. provided this answer.

I thank the questioner for raising this issue which will be of general public interest. First I will give some background then discuss the plot in question. I am sure that everyone is aware that there is a shortage of housing, particularly affordable housing in Stanley for first time buyers. When the East Stanley Development was drawing to a close there was a general agree-ment that in the current economic climate, government simply cannot afford to provide plots subsidised to the level it did in East Stanley.

The development of a workable strategy which will enable people to afford houses without bankrupt-ing the economy, is one of the Government's main priorities. We are going to ensure that the strategy is informed and sensible, and not a knee jerk reaction which only addresses short term issues. A decision on this piece of land will not be made before the Housing Strategy is agreed. The frustrating slowness of the progress is due to two particular factors:

Firstly, a surprising number of interrelated factors are involved. these include the identification of suitable sites which can be serviced at a reasonable cost, the capacity of the industry to develop and build on these plots given the shortage of certain key skills, consideration of the best way to stimulate private development, and enabling access to attordable loans

The issues are not simple: shortage of labour has implications for immigration policy, and provision of loans needs to be treated with caution, as it may have the effect of inflating house prices and making purchase even more difficult The second factor slowing the

process is the lack of human resource in government: it is not just the construction industry that could use more labour. A number of senior government officials have put in a considerable amount of overtime on this issue recently and I would like to thank the Chief Executive, Di-rector of Public Works, Environ-mental Planning Officer, Financial Secretary and Crown Counsel (A) in particular. As a result of this, a draft strategy will be presented in January. In view of the importance of the issue and the implications for other portfolio holders (PWD, immigration) I have arranged a meeting of all councillors and relevant officers which will take place in early January.

Regarding the specific area in question: it is owned by the Government and along with several other areas is being considered for housing. There are a number of reasons why this area is suitable: access to services makes it fairly economic, and proximity to other houses and shops reduces the need for vehicle use. It is a white zone on the Stanley Town Plan which means it can be considered for any reasonable de-velopment. The Town Plan was drawn up taking into account the need for green spaces, play areas and so on, and these are much more strictly controlled. The Lands and the Planning and Building commit-tees work with the Town Plan and take into account issues such as the interests of other stakeholders (e.g. neighbours) when advising how Government owned land should be used, and whether planning permis-sion should be granted. It is not always possible to please everyone, as people often have conflicting interests in housing development and it generates strong emotions. My responsibility as Chairman is to ensure an informed debate takes place and a fair and democratic decision is reached without favourit-

While I think such tree planting is admirable and public spirited. in retrospect it would have been a good idea for the individual who planted them on government land to have obtained Government's approval beforehand. It is obviously a pity if effort is wasted or mature trees have to be removed. However, IF the area is developed, I would anticipate that the trees would be seen as an asset and as many as possible incorporated into the scheme.

Q IF Mr Bussey of the Metro-politan Police had not already been in the Islands when the latest police complaint needed investigating, would an officer have been flown down from the Met to look into it?

is there a rule/law that says such complaints/allegations should be investigated by the Met or is it a judgement call by the Governor?

Under the Police Ordinance (section 21) where a report, complaint or allegation is received by the Chief Police Officer which indicates that the conduct of a police officer did not meet the appropriate standard he shall supervise the investigation of the case and may appoint an investigating officer, who shall be:

- Of at least the rank of sergeant

Of at least the same rank as the police officer concerned; Not an interested party.

However, under the terms of Inspector McGill's designation as Temporary Chief Police Officer, the exercise of such Police Ordinance complaints and disciplinary functions are not permitted without the express permission of the Governor on a case by case basis. In this case the Governor decided that it was inappropriate for a member of the RFIP to investigate the complaint.

Given the presence of the Metropolitan Police in the Falkland Islands, and that there would be no extra charges, the Governor decided to appoint DCS Bussey, as Investigating Officer, under terms of references that allowed him to utilise his officers also present to assist him (again at no extra charge).

Aquaculture development programme receives green light from government

STAFF are being recruited by the Falkland Islands Development Corporation for the new aquaculture development programme which has been funded for three years by the government (FIG).

The programme will investigate a range of candidate aquaculture species, all of which are indigenous to the Islands. There are high expectations for an aquaculture industry here, but uncertainty over what exactly it would be. The development programme lays the foundations for creation of an industry in which-

ever direction it may go. Employed by FIDC for the past nine months, the Aquaculture Development Manager Dr Brendan Gara says, "I want to thank FIDB, councillors and FIG for having the strategic vision to see the potential benefits of this programme.'

"This is a fantastic opportunity for Falkland Islanders to get involved with the creation and development of a new industry. I'm confident that development of an industry can be made without compromising other sectors, and that knowledge gained during the three years will have direct economic benefits for sectors such as tourism.

A multidisciplinary approach will be taken, combining practical

aquaculture with more detailed surveying and investigative work. By collaborating with overseas in-stitutions in the UK, Chile and the US the programme can add value to its work by drawing in Falk-lands based and overseas students to work on various topics.

The programme will initially investigate:

• Sea trout - for aquaculture and recreational fishery management

• Sea worm farming - low-tech farming and potential for a high value product

 Plankton monitoring – Island wide biotoxin monitoring for food safety and export, and to assess the carrying capacity of inshore waters for guiding future aquaculture expansion.

· Marine fish grow out - find out how fast the fish grow in Falklands conditions and then feed information back into the more demanding hatchery stages.

What about the elusive Zebra trout? Brendan commented, "It may have potential as an aquaculture opportunity in its own right, however understanding the basic biology and culture requirements is important for its conservation and the development and management of the recreational sea trout fishery."

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'Camp telecoms are a priority'

FIRM decisions about the future of telephone communications in Camp will have to be made within six months, councillors have decided.

During the meeting of General Purposes Committee held last week, they discussed a document from Cable and Wireless which sets out some options for Camp and, Councillor Mike Summers said, they are now awaiting submissions from SSVC and KTV on how television services might be delivered. It is possible the two - television and telephony - might be linked in future.

The issue is being treated as a matter of priority. Councillor Summers said.

Telecommunications consultant Chris Doyle is visiting in the Islands in January to give councillors his view on "where we are up to with the telephone issues", Councillor Summers said, adding, "we will see if he has sufficient technical knowledge to also advise on the 'jointery' between telephones and television or whether he'll have to bring someone with him."

He said it is important to identify suitable affordable technology, "...that will deliver a telephone service, hopefully also a broadband data service, to all the Camp locations."

In an interview with *Penguin* News published early this month, Aaron Richardson of Cable and Wireless said the company expected "action to be taken" on people who were "self-supplying" their own telecommunications. However, this is a more complicated issue than may first appear, Councillor Summers said.

"The Cable and Wireless licence was written to provide them with an exclusive supply arrangement for telephone services. The advent of data services - the internet and subsequently broadband and a lot of the satellite telecommunication systems that other people might have - all post date the Cable and Wireless licence."

This means, he said, "...it is not clear in law whether the Cable and Wireless licence actually covers those services that some people are apparently sourcing separately..."

He said it was understandable that Cable and Wireless believes their licence does cover those facilities, "...but the government is not entirely certain of that so it remains an area of uncertainty that needs to be cleared up in due course.

"If it transpired that somebody was in breach of the exclusive licence, it will be for the government to prosecute."

OTCC

During last week's GPC meeting. Councillors Summers and Clausen briefed their colleagues on their attendance at the Overseas Territories Consultative Council conference held earlier this month.

Councillor Summers said one of the most important things to come out of the meeting was a need to review the 1999 White Paper.

The attendance of Governors at the meeting raised this issue; Councillor Summers said none of the Chief Ministers or their equivalents at the meeting wanted Governors to be present.

He said Lord Triesman agreed to review this along with the terms of the 1999 paper. "...to see to what extent the partnership arrangements between the UK and the OTs were being met and the aspirations of the paper were being met, in terms of maximisation of internal self-government and proper partnership arrangements."

This is important, he said. "...because it will take us another stage in the relationship with the UK."

SAMA receives Pilgrimage progress report


THE wheels are well in motion for visits by veterans of the 1982 war next year.

A trip down memory lane

Fourteen years ago, December 11, 1992

PENGUIN NEWS reports that the first seismic surveys for oil in Falklands waters will take place the following January, with the two companies GEKO PRAKLA and Spectrum to carry out the work.

GEKO PRAKLA will mobilise a vessel to be in the Islands in mid January, and the first survey is expected to take four months, with the first results available in late 1993, although the full assessment will take at least another year.

The company stresses that there will be virtually no impact on the local community as port calls will take less than 24 hours, and the seismic activity will have no adverse affect on marine life.

The company's local agents, Fortuna Ltd, commented, "Although these initial surveys may only have a limited impact on the economy we hope that they will lead to future prosperity for the Falkland Islands."

Stuart Mosey, Chief Executive of the Falkland Islands Company, will leave the Islands at the end of January, to take up a position assisting with commercial development in St Helena.

FIC say that due to the reduced scale of the companies operations following the sale of the farms, it was now practicable to combine the positions of Chief Executive and Managing Director. Two vehicle accidents occurred on the MPA road, with a red Ford

Nobody was injured in the Ford Sierra incident, but a passenger in the military vehicle sustained cuts to her head which needed ten stitches.

Eleven years ago, December 20, 1995

TWO charter flights from Chile were denied permission to fly over Argentine airspace, when they filed flight plans to the Falklands.

An Aerovias DAP Falcon, which had hoped to arrive at MPA to pick up a Japanese film crew, was delayed by 24 hours while clearance was sought, and eventually given. Meanwhile, a King Air jet aircraft, chartered by millionaire Michael Ashcroft, was refused clearance to fly direct from Santiago to MPA. After flying to Punta Arenas, the aircraft was still refused permission to fly through Argentine airspace, and so had to fly to the Islands via Cape Horn, a detour that took some four hours.

There is concern at the large number of sheep losses incurred by farms due to the very severe winter weather. A 66.8% reduction in the number of hoggets shorn on West Falkland compared to the 1994/95 season is one of the shocking statistics provided by the Department of Agriculture as part of the Chief Executive's reply to a question submitted by Councillor John Birmingham.

At a General Purposes Committee, councillors accepted in principle a proposal put by its chairman, Councillor Bill Luxton, that the Government should provide some form of assistance for those farmers who had suffered crippling losses.

The Falkland Islands Government is to pay £500,000 to Peter Symonds' College towards the cost of building a new 40 bed boarding accommodation unit in the school grounds. Falkland Islands students will receive free accommodation as part of the deal.

The editorial says goodbye to recently departed Governor, David Tatham and his wife Val. The column describes Mr Tatham as, "a man of principle and integrity."

The year's Atastair Cameron History Prize winners are announced for all three sections. The senior school award is won by Andrea Poole with her project on Falkland Sound, which one judge described as a, "box of delights."

The Camp Award was won by Mark McPhee of Brookfield Farm with his entry, entitled *Mum's War Story*, which recounts the help his mother, Trudi, and other North Campers gave to the advancing British Forces in 1982.

Marti Barnes was the winner of the Junior School section with his project, The History of Football in the Falklands.



GREASY wool prices increased at the fine end of the micron spectrum but fell marginally at the broader end at sales last week in Australia, South Africa and New Zealand.

It is worth noting that 24 and 25 micron fleece wool lots in South Africa continue to trade at significant premiums over similar micron fleece lots in Australia. 25 micron lots for example are currently approximately 50 pence per kilogram higher in price in South Africa compared to Australia.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up approximately 2 pence per kilogram at 335.6 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 333.9 pence per kilogram clean.

In Australia 87% of the 65.514 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 9.739 bales of crossbred wool of which 7.937 (81%) were sold. In South Africa 96% of the 7.271

bales available were sold.

Sales resume in Australia and South Africa after a three week recess in the week commencing 8th January.





LegCo: Questions for oral answer

Inshore accidents: current legislation is unsatisfactory

THE stranding of the trawler *Holberg* in Port Purvis last month prompted a number of questions in last week's meeting of Legislative Council.

Cllr Richard Davies asked Cllr Janet Robertson if she was satisfied that the government has adequate legal powers, "...to promptly assess and deal with environmental threats caused by shipping accidents near our coasts?"

Reading an answer provided by the Attorney General's Chambers, Cllr Robertson said the Governor has the power, under section 12 of the Prevention of Oil Pollution Act 1971, to take a wide range of steps if he is of the opinion that oil from the ship will or may cause pollution on a large scale and is also of the opinion that the use of the powers conferred is urgently needed.

The obvious limitations on the powers available, she continued, are in cases where pollution or the potential pollution resulting from an accident to a ship is not on a large scale. The Oil in Territorial Waters Ordi-

The Oil in Territorial Waters Ordinance 1960 does allow for prosecution in relation to oil spills, she said. "It has the effect of imposing a requirement upon those responsible to take all reasonable steps as soon as practicable to stop or minimise an escape of oil and if those steps are not taken, a prosecution can result."

Cllr Davies asked if the government has adequate powers to reclaim costs which might be incurred by them in assessing and dealing with such threats, and Cllr Robertson cited the Merchant Shipping (Oil Pollution) (Falkland Islands) Order 1997 in response.

She said this creates a civil liability for some forms of pollution such as:

(a) any damage caused by contamination resulting from the discharge of oil;
(b) for the cost of measures taken after the discharge or escape; and for any damage caused by any of the measures being taken above.

She added, "It should be noted that the Order only has the effect of creating a civil liability. A claim may have to be enforced through the courts, and difficulties could arise should the party liable not be present in the jurisdiction.

"In addition, a significant restriction upon the effectiveness of the Merchant Shipping (Oil Pollution) (Falkland Islands) Order 1997 is the fact that oil is defined as persistent hydrocarbon mineral oil. That definition does not include marine gas oil (MGO), so no civil liability is created by this provision in the case of a spill involving MGO."

the case of a spill involving MGO." She concluded, "I would suggest that our legislation is not satisfactory, the definition of a large scale will cause us some problems and maybe what was considered large scale in 1971 is not what we would call large scale or of immediate threat now.

"We also have the issue that whereas we do have measures in relation to hydrocarbon mineral oil, we don't have any measures in relation to MGO and I think that's something we should address."

When questioned further, Cllr Robertson said no intention of reviewing legislation has been stated but added. "I think it is something which we as councillors have a responsibility to do if that is how we wish to proceed."

Oil spill response

Cllr Davies then asked Cllr Clausen if she was satisfied that the Islands have contingency plans, appropriate resources and skills to promptly assess and control oil spills. He added, "Is the plan reviewed and skills practiced on a regular basis?"

In her answer, which included information supplied by the Fisheries Department, Clir Clausen said the Falkland Islands National Oil Spill Contingency Plan was formulated by a UK consultancy company, Oil Spill Response Ltd., in preparation for the hydrocarbon drilling round which took place in 1998.

"It has been updated since as required to reflect changes in personnel, although the overall strategy sections do remain unchanged. That is a public document which is available in the public library and can be collected from the Department of Fisheries."

She said a quantity of oil containment equipment sufficient to deal with small spills of oil was purchased at that time. "It was recognised that any large persistent oil spill would require outside assistance, probably deployed from the UK."

Initially, Cllr Clausen said, training courses on the plan and deployment of equipment were held in Stanley for Fisheries Department, FIDF, PWD and other government and non-government departments as appropriate by personnel from Oil Spill Response Ltd.

Oil Spill Response Ltd. She said there is a "sufficient small nucleus" of people at the Fisheries Department trained in the use of the oil spill containment equipment to deploy it effectively. However, she added, the Fisheries Department does not have the manpower of full resources to deploy the equipment over extended periods of time without calling on outside assistance as required, such as sea or land transport. dependent on location and additional labour. "The heavy and bulky nature of some of the equipment such as containment booms increases the labour requirement." she added.

Deployment to a remote location would require "considerable logistical planning" to provide transport to the site and provision of a working base in close proximity to the area, Clir Clausen continued. "For instance the deployment of booms would require not only the provision of a base vessel, but also the use of fairly powerful boats. Good communications and health and safety back-up are also paramount."

The Contingency Plan has been exercised as part of larger joint Search and Rescue exercises with the military, although some of the equipment has been used in real-life scenarios during minor spills in the (Stanley) harbour. Cllr Clausen said. "A full live exercise hasn't actually taken place since 1990 although a number of desktop exercises with the military have taken place."

Cllr Davies then asked if external assistance would inevitably have to be sought for relatively small spills in isolated areas - as with the *Holberg*. Cllr Clausen answered, "That does depend on the actual incident that takes place. In this case it was judged, due to the nature of the MGO and as a result of the aerial surveillance that took place, it was not deemed a feasible exercise to try and move all of the equipment out there.

"Booms for example work much better in calm conditions, and at the time the weather wasn't perhaps the most suitable. MGO does tend to evaporate quite quickly, especially in choppy conditions and that was the advice we had at the time."

She added that there is the possibility of retaining international oil spill response companies, "...and in the past this has been considered but has been deemed to be overly expensive, considering the risks we are susceptible to." She said this might change if, in the future, the Falklands had an offshore hydrocarbon industry.

Clir Clausen added that it is necessary to look at all lessons learned, "...to see where we need to look to improve what we have."

Why do we need baggage restrictions when NZ/Aus don't?

COUNCILLOR Mike Rendell has asked why new restrictions have been placed on items allowed to be carried as hand baggage on all international flights leaving the Falklands.

He told Legislative Council that when he recently travelled in both New Zealand and Australia, no such restrictions were in place.

In providing her response, prepared by the Civil Aviation Department, Councillor Janet Robertson said the serious aviation security alert in the UK in August identified a need to develop counter measures to a novel form of potential terrorist attack on aviation, involving improvised explosive devices using a liquid-based explosive.

liquid-based explosive. "New security measures, which in particular place controls on liquids able to be taken aboard aircraft, have since been adopted across all EU Member States

States. "These measures match very closely those adopted in the USA and Canada for the same purpose, and the International Civil Aviation Organisation has advised the ICAO Contracting States to implement the extra security measures."

As the UK is signatory to Annex 17 of the Chicago Convention for both itself and its Overseas Territories, these new baseline security measures have been implemented in the Overseas Territories.

When asked what cost implications these new regulations had, Cllr Robertson replied, "Under the user pays principle, it will be for the aviation industry to meet any associated costs, which they may seek to pass through passengers." Clir Rendell asked his colleague whether there is a perception that there is a threat similar to that facing the UK and USA in the Falklands.

USA in the Falklands. She responded, "Quite clearly I don't think anybody believes that we have anything like the same level of security threat.

"The fact remains that we are an Overseas Territory of the UK and we fall under the regulations to which they comply and that is the way our Civil Aviation industry works in the Falklands."

Companies Bill is passed, giving 'more freedom' to businesses

COUNCILLORS have approved a "highly technical Bill" which brings Falklands law on company accounts, audit and other financial matters in to line with standards set in the United Kingdom and European Union.

Introducing the Companies (Amendment) Bill 2006, Financial Secretary Derek Howatt said the new law will not be burdensome but, "...in some instances. The change will allow companies more freedom to conduct their affairs as they wish."

He said the development of the Bill has taken several years to complete, and lengthy consultations have taken place on the content and drafting of the Bill with the local accountancy profession and the Chamber of Commerce. He said that the law means many company accounts would no longer require audit, "...thus saving money as overseas auditors would no longer be required by them."

Cllr Summers commented that there are a number of changes brought about by this legislation that are welcomed by the business community, "...especially the ability to purchase one's own shares which provides much more flexibility in running small closely held companies..." However he told the House he does

However he told the House he does not like "this type" of legislation: "Not the content but the way it is produced, because it makes reference to UK legislation and you have to cross reference any number of documents to be able to understand it, it is very complicated. "All Members in this House at one

All Memory in this House at one time or another have talked about issues and transparency are not only to do with holding meetings in public and making information public, it is also to do with having law that is clearly written and clearly understandable.

"You shouldn't have to be a lawyer to understand the law that affects you or your business that you're doing." He added, "I hope when we move

He added, "I hope when we nove further along the track of introducing and/ or revising company law, we bear this view in mind. It really is not helpful to have such complicated drafting."

Also passed was an amendment to the Falkland Islands Status Bill. This allows for the introduction of a pledge and ceremonies for the grant of Status.

The Bill provides that applications shall be considered quarterly by Executive Council and that the ceremonies shall be held approximately one month following the grant of status.

Cllr Davies commented on the pledge that will be part of the ceremony. He said, "Some people may think that a pledge is not terribly important but 1 think it has great symbolic value.

"I would like to express my satisfaction that the wording of the pledge has been made by the Falkland Islands councillors and not by the UK government." Page 24
