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THE Falklands has bid farewell to a man regarded by many as a hero for his actions during the 1982 conflict. Following a battle with cancer, Terry Peck MBE CPM passed away on December 30. A former Chief of Police and twice elected as a member of Legislative Council, in 1982 Mr Peck fought in the battle for Mt Longdon alongside members of the Third Battalion, Parachute Regiment. He was Chairman of the Falklands branch of the South Atlantic Medal Association for four years.

A gathering was held in memory of Mr Peck at the FIDF Hall on Wednesday and attended by around two hundred and fifty people; as a mark of respect, government flags were flown at half-mast throughout the day. New Year's Honours

POPULAR art teacher Mirabelle 'Tim' Simpson has been awarded the MBE in the New Year's Honours list.

Mrs Simpson, who is due to retire from the Community School at the end of next term, says she was "pretty excited but shocked" when told she was to receive the honour in recognition of her work in education and charities in the Falkland Islands.

She is not planning to collect her medal from the Queen at Buckingham Palace - "it's an awfully long way" - and instead hopes to receive it from the Governor at a reception at Government House. "That way I can invite some friends along too."

Also in the New Year's Honours, Tim Carr, former Curator of the South Georgia Museum was awarded the MBE for his work in South Georgia and Mr lan Thomson, Director of Argos Georgia Ltd, was awarded the OBE for his work in South Georgia and Antarctic Fisheries. HER Royal Highness, The Princess Royal arrives in the Falklands next week, accompanied by her husband, Rear Admiral Timothy Laurence.

Royal programme revealed

Princess Anne will call in for three days on her way to Antarctica. She will visit Chile after her Antarctic trip.

Gilbert House this week revealed the Royal visitor's programme, which begins on Friday, January 12.

After meeting members of the Armed Forces based at Mount Pleasant and on board HMS *Dumbarton Castle*, Princess Anne will travel to Fitzroy to lay a wreath at the RFA and Welsh Guards Memorials. She will then head to Stanley.

On Saturday she will visit penguin and albatross colonies on Saunders Island and meet West Falklands residents at the Social Club at Hill Cove.

She will return to Stanley that

afternoon and attend a Civic Reception hosted by the government in the Town Hall, beginning at 4pm.

Tickets for the reception will be available from Gilbert House on a 'first come first served' basis from 10am today (Friday).

On Sunday, January 14, The Princess Royal will lay a wreath at the Liberation Monument before attending a church service and youth reception at the Cathedral.

She will tour the Fishery Patrol Vessel *Pharos* that afternoon, then attend a lunch at the Lighthouse Seamen's Centre.

Her final afternoon will be spent meeting representatives of the Chamber of Commerce, the Tourist Board and Falklands Conservation and she will visit the Government Archives.

She is due to depart for Antarctica aboard the British Antarctic Survey Dash-7 aircraft on the morning of Monday, January 15. Friday, January 5, 2007

Planning begins for ferry terminals

A REPORT dealing with infrastructure issues for the cross sound ferry terminals is to be prepared by the Director of Public Works.

Last month Executive Council gave approval for the government to enter into a formal contract with Workboat Services Limited for the provision of coastal shipping and the cross sound ferry service; now, the Chief Executive this week said, there is "a great deal of work" to be done to prepare the infrastructure for the ferry.

Chris Simpkins commented, "No reliable estimates of cost are yet available, not least because options require examination and solutions designed.

"Nothing is yet finally agreed but, on the East, the permanent terminal is still likely to be at Newhaven but a temporary solution at another location is being examined to enable the ferry to operate whilst design and construction is completed. It will not be possible to construct a permanent facility this season."

Late last year, *Penguin News* reported that the Port Howard jetty was being considered as the final site for the terminal, despite the government having already built a road to Second Creek, south of Port Howard settlement.

Mr Simpkins this week said the West Falkland terminal will be at Port Howard. "...but the precise location has not yet been agreed pending the report to the Transport Advisory Committee."

Cruise ships this week

NEW ISLAND and Carcass Island will both receive visits from two cruise ships today (Friday). They are expecting MV Grigorty Mikheev and Clipper Advenurer, with approximately 44 and 122 passengers respectively.

Norwegian Crown will visit Stanley today with around 1.050 passengers and Grigoriy Mikheev and Clipper Adventurer will both head to Stanley tomorrow.

On Sunday, *Clipper Adventurer* will visit Sea Lion Island and Bleaker Island while *The World* (with around 650 passengers) will be in Stanley. *Hanseatic* will visit New Island and Carcass Island.

On Monday, *The World* will call at Bleaker Island while *Hanseatic* will visit Stanley and *Infinity* (1,800) and *Explorer* 11 (199) will also visit Stanley. *Polar Pioneer* (56) visits Sea Lion

Island on Tuesday while it is the turn of Akademik Sergey Vavilov (100) on Wednesday.

Polar Pioneer will be in Stanley on Thursday and Bremen (180) will be call at George and Barren Islands.

THE trawler which ran aground in Port Purvis on November 5 has been refloated.

Director of Fisheries, John Barton said that Marine Officer Jon Clark, who has been on site in Port Purvis for some time, had reported that the *Holberg* was refloated on Tuesday morning.

Mr Barton commented, "Once afloat, operations continued to pump out water from the *Holberg*. Pumping stopped later in the day when an oil/water mixture started to appear. Some fuel was then transferred to the *Mariana Rojamar II*."

Mr Barton described the news of the vessel's refloatation with no significant pollution as "extremely good news".

He said Mr Clark had reported that the team on the Mariana Rojamar II were "doing their utmost" over the Christmas and New Year period to salvage the vessel and added, "the successful refloating of the vessel is a testimony to that." The operations were hampered by the frequent gales in December.

The operation still has some way to go with the *Holberg* being ticipated that it will take around three days to prepare the vessel for towing away and that will depend on weather. The Environmental Planning Officer has commended the work

Officer has commended the work done by government departments and the owner of the *Holberg* to carry out the detailed surveys, remove the marine gas oil and refloat the vessel.

Dominique Giudicelli commented, "The salvage of the *Holberg* has, so far, been conducted in a very professional manner and to high environmental standards by the salvage crew aboard Mariana Rojamar II under the supervision of the Marine Officer, Jon Clark

"There should be few long-term environmental effects on the Port Purvis environment from the wrecking of the *Holberg*."

However, she added that the Environmental Planning Department is looking forward to an assessment by the Fisheries Department of its policy to licence vessels to conduct experimental fishing in shallow pristine waters "

The following day it is saddle up and head for the Fitzroy Memorials, a distance of about 40 miles; finally on the 15th they will complete their challenge by riding to the 1982 Liberation Memorial in Stanley.

Customer concerns over C&W's legal arrangements

CONCERNS have been raised about the novation agreement circulated with a covering letter to account holders by the newly set up company of Cable and Wireless South Atlantic Limited.

The agreement states that the courts of England have exclusive jurisdiction to settle any dispute arising from or connected with the agreement.

The covering letter concludes by saying that by continuing to pay invoices raised in relation to the Original Agreement, by the new company, Cable and Wireless South Atlantic, "it will be deemed that you have consented to this novation taking place." Brian Summers of Cable and Wireless said that the matter 15. "...being raised with the C&W legal team in London and a full reply will be published in a future edition of Penguin News."

Commenting on the novation. Councillor Mike Summers said it had been brought to the attention of the government who were "not happy" and the matter has been taken up by the Chief Executive.

"It seems highly inappropriate that a company established in the Falklands with an exclusive contract with FIG should seek English law or the use of English courts," Councillor Summers said.

PM Blair pledges 'productive co-operation' with Argentina

Mr Blair anticipated that the events planned for the 25th anniversary in the UK and the Islands will be a "fitting and respectful" tribute to all those who fought in the conflict, and in particular to those who lost their lives defending "your freedom and your right to determine your own future".

Mr Blair's full speech

"As the year draws to a close, I'm glad again to have this chance to send my best wishes to everyone on the Falkland Islands. It's an opportunity as well to reflect on what has been, I know, a busy, prosperous and sometimes difficult time and to look forward to 2007 with the special significance that it holds. "Thanks to your efforts, the Falkland Islands' economy is in good health. The sensible and longterm decisions you have taken to develop your fishing industry are now paying off while tourism continues to prosper.

"The islands are increasingly a destination for cruise ships, with some 45,000 visitors coming ashore in the last season. Given the stunning natural beauty and wildlife of the islands and the hard work of the Tourist Board, I am sure these numbers will increase.

"The improvement in air links which the Falkland Islands Government are working hard to secure will also lead to a welcome increase in tourist numbers. I also want to pay tribute to the efforts being made on the Falkland Islands to safeguard this wonderful environment and our planet as a whole.

"The world is, I am pleased to say, waking up to the threat that mankind's impact on our climate poses to us all. The disastrous costs and consequences of ignoring climate change was underlined when we published the Stern review in October.

Assault leads to Christmas in prison

A YOUNG man spent Christmas in prison after his guilty plea to a charge of obstructing a police officer, triggered a one month suspended sentence.

In court on December 22, Ryan Hawksworth (21) admitted obstructing a police officer in the course of his duty; when police arrested him for suspected criminal damage on November 18 and tried to place him in a cell, Mr Hawksworth put up a violent struggle. He told the court he felt he had been wrongfully arrested and did not want to go in a cell.

In September, Mr Hawksworth received a month's suspended sentence for assault; another sentence for a similar offence in May had been deferred and Mr Hawksworth is to be sentenced for this in March.

The Senior Magistrate initially indicated she wished to gather further information on Mr Hawksworth however he requested that the matter be dealt with that day.

He was therefore sentenced to seven days in prison for obstructing the police officer and the suspended sentence from September was activated. He will spend a total of 38 days in prison.

'Woodland' area's history

1 WOULD like to explain and clarify some points raised by your question and Councillor Davies reply regarding tree planting near the Chandlery (*PN* 22.12.06). This land forms part of the

This land forms part of the Market Garden which was leased for 25 years in 1991 from FIDC to whom it was Crown Granted (no. 620) in 1988.

Under the terms of the lease FIDC (not FIG) are the registered landowners to whom we are responsible to carry out normal agricultural practices under the lease. Tree planting is a reasonably normally activity for an agricultural tenancy.

Thus we have never had any need to consult with FIG about what we do within the lease.

As the land area in question was not suitable for arable development we decided, five years ago, to plant it with 5,000 trees and develop it - all at our expense - as a woodland park area on the edge of Stanley to be handed back as an area for public amenity when the lease expires in nine years. By then the original trees would be at least 8-10 feet high and with some other varieties added, paths put in and small areas opened as picnic sites etc.

The first indication we had of FIG's interest in building houses on this land was 16 months ago when release of funds towards an energy conservation twinwall greenhouse re-cladding project was blocked - unless Stanley Growers immediately agreed to a lease variation giving up this land area. We declined the assistance offer.

During the early-mid 1990's planning strategy had the Market Garden area as a "green-belt buffer zone" between residential and industrial Stanley. Furthermore planning recommendations of that time recommended the retention of green and cultivated areas close to Stanley and that future building/ commercial development should be on the hundreds of acres of unused land adjacent to Stanley such as that just a few yards away the other side of the Airport Road.

This would have appeared a sensible and practical approach as "green" or cultivated land is not exactly abundant in the Falklands, nor are woodland areas,

Short term small "infills" for building may save a bit in the start but do nothing more than delay the necessary more permanent, phased, long term planning decisions. Tim Miller

forts, ably assisted by Len McGill and his officers as well as members of the FIDF, the whole endeavour was a resounding success.


The coffers of SAMA were considerably swelled and a new wheelchair was presented to the King Edward VII Hospital from Lomax, UK.

Mr Luxton reflects on 2006

JUST a few observations on a number of different subjects as we say goodbye to 2006.

The long drawn out review of the Constitution seems to be reaching a conclusion. There is one item that I hope Camp residents will not lose sight of - the question of one or two Constituencies.

The referendum on this subject led to an overwhelming rejection by Campers of the proposed single constituency and it was also rejected by Stanley voters by a lesser, but significant margin. However "they" are not satisfied with this - and are mounting an effort to get "their" way by a different route.

Removing the matter from the Constitution and placing it in the electoral ordinance will seriously weaken our position. It will be a simple matter to keep on trying to slip the change through by legislation from time to time. I strongly urge Camp voters - and those Stanley voters who expressed the same opinion - to make it clear that the question of Constituencies should not be removed from the Constitution. A single Constituency will in time lead effectively to a complete loss of representation for the Camp population.

Turning to another major Camp interest - the interim ferry. It is good to see it working so well this summer so far but plans for the ferry proper seem to have gone awfully quiet - except for some disturbing rumours, which always occur when the government does not keep us informed.

As usual- the diddle dee telegraph is in top gear. One rumour is that the West terminal will not be at Second Creek but in Port Howard settlement. While this may offer a short term cost saving, I believe it would be a big mistake in the long term.

This has been a project dear to my heart for about 30 years and I have a pile of reports and surveys in my office on it. The consensus of these is that the best options for the terminals are Second Creek and Newhaven.

Even more worrying is the rumour that Newhaven will also be abandoned and that Port San Carlos will be used. This would be a disaster! The road to Stanley from Port San Carlos is totally unsuitable when compared with that from Newhaven, for heavy and winter traffic - which is what we hope it will generate.

Future military use of the ferry may even be the way to make it economically viable. One assumes that most of this traffic would come from MPA/Mare Harbour. Imagine what this would do to the North Camp Road. Also, the passage time to Port San Carlos is almost twice as long and more subject to bad weather constraints.

I hope these stories are not true and will be quickly quashed - and it would also be good to know what progress is being made.

And, just a thought, what about making the ferry schedule from Thursday to Sunday? It would enable Camp people to do some business in town and, with a bit of planning from the hospital, people could see the dentist or doctor if needed.

Finally, I can't leave 2006 without a mention of our old friends Cable and Wireless.

The diddle dee again says that the Camp system does not have a long life left and that C&W are waiting for the government to make some decisions about the future.

One hopes that we might soon get some information about this too and that FIG will take a long term view and go for a system that can cope with the future and give Camp the opportunity to have broadband as well as other communications related assets - television, radio, and mobile phones, etc.

Now that Stanley and MPA have access to broadband, I hope that C&W will carry out their promise made some time ago that people stuck with dial up only will have some reduction for heavy internet use and have some sort of cap on the charges that we pay now compared with Broadband where it is available.

Finally, in the 25th year since our freedom was restored by British Forces, let us never forget the sacrifices made for that freedom and continue to make the Falklands of 2007 a good and prosperous place for all. Happy New Year! Bill Luxton Chartres

Keith's ram is West Falkland show champion

IN contrast to the previous day of heavy rain, Thursday, December 28 dawned bright and clear for the West Falkland Ram and Fleece Show.

Some partygoers' heads may have also been a little clouded after the Camp wedding the day before but none of this distracted the residents and visitors to Fox Bay Village, who were once again anticipating a good day out and were not to be disappointed.

Keith had worked hard to transform the woolshed and Reuben, after a variety of other tasks, helped Keith take entries, some of which had already arrived by FIGAS. When Tony and Susan arrived

When Tony and Susan arrived with their entries, they also gave invaluable help. As usual the entries started as a trickle but it soon became quite hectic as the deadline for entries approached. The Islander aircraft made an early visit, delivering His Excellency the Governor to present the prizes in the afternoon.

Once the entries were all in. Paul Robertson. Peter Johnson and Ted Jones set about the daunting and onerous task of selecting the fleece having the highest commercial value. They did this by working out the clean weight by estimating the yield and then multiplying this by the actual greasy weight. They then estimated the average fibre diameter before multiplying the clean weight by today's prices for that micron wool.

Once this had been accomplished the next task was to select from the

twenty-nine rams entered in the three ram classes the one they considered to have the 'Best Conformation' along with the 'Runner up' and third place.

Next they had to judge the Champion Ram and Reserve Champion from all the Rams exhibited in the Show, not a job for the fainthearted.

A total of seventy-seven fleeces from fifteen farms and twenty-nine rams from seven farms were exhibited at this year's show. All the entries had been carefully selected from tens of thousands of fleeces and hundreds of rams, every one a credit to its owner.

By now the barbecue, which had been set up by Tex and Mandy Alazia - and this year in the capable hands of Leon, Justin, Chris and Tex plus other numerous helpers was in full swing. This fortified all those who intended to judge the three classes of rams and the three classes of fleeces, which now awaited them back at the woolshed.

Once this task had been accomplished the time consuming job of counting up the judging slips took place, before the final results were known. These were all then competently collated by Lisa.

The sheep used in the fleece weight competition was then skilfully relieved of its fleece by Ali and both the fleece and the sheep were weighed. This enabled the winners in the other competitions to be worked out.

The fleece weight and the sheep weight competition produced some

mile run with a convincing lead and Dominic Watson and Mark Plunkett battle it out for second place with an impressive sprint to the finish.

MAURICE Davis' five year old thoroughbred Dashing Dancer broke 27th was washed out because of heavy rain) the number of competing horses the unofficial 700 yards record with a time of 38 seconds while winning the 2006 Governor's Cup. Bred out of the imported Chilean

mare Pollerita and the English stallion Thyer, Dashing Dancer improved her record to 20 wins from 21 races. She technically 'lost' a race at North Arm when, after coming under start-ers orders, the mare failed to run. *Mi Hausita* in 1963 and *Capizana* in 2000 were both recorded at 39 seconds for the distance.

With the owner sidelined for medical reasons, Arthur Turner rode Dashing Dancer to her six one-sided victories at the Christmas sports meet-ing. The full potential of this amazing animal has yet to be revealed as she has never been under severe pressure in any of her winning races. In the Governor's Cup Timmy Bonner's Zafonic, winner of the race in 2005. fought valiantly and at one stage of the race appeared to be closing the gap, but when Arthur Turner asked his mount for a little extra, she soon opened up an impressive lead and strode on to victory. Hayley Bonner brought the excellent 2002 and 2003 winner Florida into third place.

Given previously recorded times over 500, 600 and 700 yards, there seems little doubt that Dashing Dancer is the fastest horse ever to race in the Falklands, and she could possibly go on to equal or surpass Bambina's record of five straight Gov-ernor's Cup victories, established in 1933, twice in 1934, 1935 and 1936. Dashing Dancer, Champion Horse

with 18 points, went on to record further wins in the A.G. Barton Prize, the See Me Do It Cup, the Des Peck Memorial Trophy, the Standard Char-tered Trophy and finally the Simon Summers Memorial Champion race.

Zafonic, still improving and scemingly recovered from his shin stiffness, eased home in the Berkeley Sound Plate, ahead of Clanny's Cruiser (Arthur Turner) and Eric Goss's Thylinda (Hayler Bonner).

While there were many thrilling finishes to excite the large crowd on Boxing Day, and the reduced attendance on Thursday 28th (Wednesday

rain) the number of competing horses was somewhat disappointing. Too many races had just three or four entries, and there were a couple of 'two horse' events.

The Cable and Wireless Maiden Plate attracted three newcomers to the course and Timmy Bonner's Balanchine, bred out of former Governor's Cup winner Dory and Dancing Brave, gamely battled on in the last few strides to beat Arthur Turn-er's Dude With An Attitude. Dude was voted 'Best Turned Out Horse' to win Tony Pettersson's prize. The Penguin News Trophy, virtually a Maiden Plate re-run but 100 yards further, was again a triumph for the Bonner/Balanchine combination.

Apart from Dashing Dancer's domination, the remainder of the races were fairly open. Ron Binnie took the Bike Anderson Prize on his Southern Dancer, bred from his four times Governor's Cup winner Sheba and Thyer, and a full brother to Shyre which won the Chief Executive's Plate with Michele Evans riding.

Shyre showed plenty of stamina when taking the Rose Bar Mile, beating last year's winner Millfield Pride.

Punters who backed Serendipity were delighted to receive £14 on their £1 tickets – odds of 13/1. A second victory in the Billy Duncan Memorial followed for the Rincon Grand-bred animal.

Fifteen year old Duane Evans appears to have inherited much of his mother's (Michele Evans) and grandfather's (Ron Binnie) riding ability. Duane was a popular winner of the Port San Carlos Prize on Thyroid, and was just pipped on the line by Tim Bonner on Tuscany in the Falkland

sharon Halford announced her retirement from racing, and the retirement also of her smart black speedster Magic. They did not go out ster Magic. They and not go out meekly though, with Sharon winning the Ladies Chase over 300 yards, and the Laures Store Ladies Gallop over 500 and finishing a close second in the Mount Pleasant Riding Club Trophy, which went to Ron Binnie's Southern Dancer. Mr and Mrs Bobby Short's trophy for the highest finishing mili-tary rider went to Jo Vincent on Cha-

rismd. The Open events, traditionally confined to the imported horses, saw a good mixture of Chilean imports and locally-bred animals pitted against each other. Old favourite Florida (Tim Bonner) won the Diana Turner Dash over 440 yards, beating FIB Clanny's Cruiser (Stefen Clarke) and the Chilean import Papina (Ron Binnie). Maurice Davis' Fonta Blanca won

the Heather Pettersson Memorial Cup, but Papina turned the tables in the Darwin Shipping Prize and the Salvador Prize (Champion Race) beating Florida on each occasion.

In 1999, local girl Sara Halford won the Armed Forces Challenge Cup on San Diego. Now as Corporal Halford, and with two long stints in Iraq behind her, she returned to the Islands and took the same race, this time on Fonta Blanca. Donna Murray. second in 2005, had to settle for second place again, this time on Tuscany.

The Jockey's Championship was dominated by Tim Bonner and Arthur Turner. Arthur rode 12 winners and Timmy 9, but the latter had more minor placings to finish with 46 points with the runner-up on 44 points. Timmy Bonner's total equalled that of the previous best, established in 1983 (150th Anniversary meeting) by Eric Goss. Despite suffering a broken bone in his leg, after being kicked at the start of a race, Arthur Turner, unaware of the extent of his injury. downed pain killers and rode another four winners before racing ended for the day.

The Young jockey's events, as al-ways, attracted much interest and en-

thusiasm from both the jockeys and their young friends who cheered them on. Dominic Watson, something of a daredevil rider, came bursting through to snatch the Pinza Gallop on Milfuego. He added the Junior Rincon Grande and Home Farm Plate to his collection. However 11 year old Macauley Davis had his revenge in the Bobby Short Gallop, riding Miami Lance. Macauley also won the Southern Cross Trophy and the Interserve Cup. Another II year old Kyran Evans rode well and took several third placings on the veteran Mr Sheen.

Stefan Clarke took the Kool Kidz Cup on Dude with an Attitude. The title of Best Young Jockey went to Dominic Watson by just one point from Macauley Davis.

The Foot Events attracted more entries than previous years, with Zoran Zuvic taking the 220 yards, the William McGill one mile in a time of 6' 49", which would certainly have been quicker had he had stiffer oppo-sition, and the 440 yards events. Youngster Robert McMahon sprinted well to win the 100 yards.

With many of the foot and gymkhana events being incorporated into the traditional second days racing programme, an extra mile foot event was added and 15 year old Thomas Burston showed considerable talent to win in just under six minutes.

79 year old Billy Poole won the Veterans Handicap for the fourth year in succession, once again beating his 'old' rival George Butler.

Zoe Luxton emulated her mother's success when winning the Ladies Race over 80 yards and the Sack Race.

Nancy Poole and her team of volunteers again provided an excellent and efficient service for those wishing to have a bet on the Tote, which was first established in 1924.

The course, which was mowed two weeks in advance of the meeting, looked in tip-top condition. and the considerable drainage work, undertaken over the past two years, seems well worthwhile. As time moves on towards the 100th meeting, it is hoped that the future of the racecourse and its facilities will soon be decided in a positive manner.





International SAFER scientists join Falkland's biodiversity programme

BIODIVERSITY research in the Falkland Islands is a productive mix of local efforts and visiting scientists from overseas.

Whilst some overseas scientists visit for only a few short weeks. many research groups from Ger-many. Portugal, Britain and New Zealand arrive each year to conduct their annual research.

One such conservation group is the Sub-Antarctic Foundation for Ecosystems Research (SAFER), who owns and conducts ecological restoration work, and basic biological research on the Bense Island Group off Port North in West Falklands SAFER scientists have been quietly working away on Bense, nearby Lit-tle Bense, and Cliff Islands since purchasing the islands in 1996. SAFER is co-ordinated by two

New Zealanders. Dr Peter Carey and Mr Malcolm Macfarlane, who have worked in New Zealand's sub-Antarctic islands, and Antarctica. They first visited the Falklands 15 years ago as naturalists on cruise ships, and both became enamoured with the islands and the people ever since.

Dr Peter Carey, Director of SAFER, explains that, "SAFER's overall goal is to improve wildlife habitat, but there are so many things that we hope to accomplish along the way. For example, Bense Island has three introduced pests - Norway rats, mice, and rabbits. We plan to eradicate all of these, but we don't want to do that until we've had a chance to study their ecology," Dr. Carey explains. "We want to first learn a bit more about what they are eating, and exactly how they are affecting the native plants and animals. We think we can learn more if we can compare the island with pests with the same island without pests.

SAFER has taken an ecosystemwide approach, similar to that used on other islands in the Falkland Islands, such as on New Island. Ac-cording to Dr Carey, "the size of Bense Island, at about 300 acres, is ideal for getting a handle on the complex relationships between the plants and animals. Any smaller and there wouldn't be a large enough sample size for all individuals, but any larger and it would be difficult to for us to cover the whole island's population.

Most of SAFER's recent work in the Bense Island Group has involved surveying the existing vegetation and wildlife, and studying the rodents. Dr Carey has been doing index trapping of the rats and mice in an effort to understand their habitat preferences and population densities. "Our preliminary results suggest that rats prefer the coasts and adjacent tussock, while more mice are found at inland sites," he explains.

Former Governor Howard Pearce is the Patron of SAFER, and with his wife Caroline, visited Bense Island in 2004. During their visit, the basic but well equipped field camp - a small shed and a partiallyrestored shanty - was only just up and running

Dr. Carey has found graffiti on the shanty walls dating back to 1926. "Since then, the weather and some less-than-gentle treatment by British forces training on the island in 1985 have taken their toll on the building." In addition, a major fire broke out during this training exercise, burning almost 20% of the island. The burned area is still completely devoid of plant life and Dr. Carey is investigating whether the rabbits are hindering natural regrowth.

"The islands are certainly in need of some loving care to restore them to prime wildlife habitat, but through SAFER, we are confident that we can make the changes needed to assist a natural rehabilitation on Bense Island," explains Dr. Carey. That SAFER scientists seem to be in for the long haul as far as Falklands biodiversity goes, seems like a good beginning!



The weather on the day was blustery with frequent heavy showers which made play very tough.


John Burns' strong Celtic character enabled him to ignore the conditions and stride to victory several shots clear of the field with a nett 67.

Vet hopeful of reindeer recovery

AFTER losing more than half its number at Hill Cove, the national reindeer herd is now doing much better at its new home, Albemarle,

Vet Joe Hollins this week reported that he visited the herd over the New Year and was delighted with their progress. He said that, due to the prob-

lems they were having at Hill Cove, he had feared many would be bar-ren; only one had been obviously pregnant. "However the herd of 12 is now accompanied by four fawns, all of which appear to be female and are in good condition. This is ideal since excess stags result in a fight to gain herd dominance. whereas what we require at the moment is breeders.

He said the condition of the animals has improved markedly "they are now fully fleshed if not tat, with full bellies, have either shed or have begun to shed their old white coats for glossy chocolate summer coats, and are in velvet

He was "personally amazed" that animals could make such a turnaround in less than two months.

The reindeer herd arrived in the Falklands in 2001, when 59 fawns were imported from South Georgia. In November, Penguin News reported that animal numbers had plummeted and Mr Hollins had travelled to Hill Cove to supervise their capture and movement to Albemarle and eventually to camp at Cape Meredith. From a herd of

32 animals, only 13 remained The reindeer made the move well, he said. "We had one calf born prematurely at Hill Cove to a maiden cow (doe) which she abandoned. Hand rearing was attempted, but the fawn was a very immature animal, a slow starter, and despite doing well initially, succumbed to diarrhoea after 10 days. This was disappointing but unsurprising.

Because the reindeer were in a weakened state. I expected a loss en route. Actually they travelled exceedingly well, far better than expected by a long way." Once at Albemarle, another ani-

mal was lost within the first 48 hours, when one of the oldest cows died in a ditch, Mr Hollins put this down to her weakened state. "So the herd was reduced to 12. Fortunately it is well balanced, with one adult stag, one yearling stag, and the rest females.

Mr Hollins was grateful for the assistance of Leon Marsh, "who dropped everything to truck them, and to Albemarle farmer Leon Berntsen

Why have they suffered?

Mr Hollins said a number of factors contributed to the animals suffering at Hill Cove. "Faeces samples showed that they had become quite heavily parasitized with sheep nematodes (worms), appropriate foodstuffs - lichens, mosses and so on - had probably become eaten out and are slow to replace, and the poor summer, resulting in poor body fat (exacerbated by worms) was followed by a wet winter with high wind chill factors.

He added that "The Falklands Factor" also played a part, explaining, "It is likely that the area was simply deficient in something that they required. This is not the habi-tal in which they evolved, although it resembles it

Albemarle should be different, Mr Hollins said, because Mr Berntsen has put aside the area for use by the reindeer only: they will compete with no other stock except stray sheep. He added, "It has only really

had a few horses and cattle on it in the last few years as Leon has been preparing for the reindeer for some time. This makes it virtually clean land as far as parasites are concerned.

Mr Hollins said the area is "the same but of outstanding quality compared to Hill Cove. "There are appropriate foods of all sorts in great quantities: lichens, moss beds, sedges, cinnamon grass, and masses of tussac, as well as extensive greens, numerous pockets of permanent water, good shelter with rocky bluffs and escarpments for weather of all types and conditions. Leon knows it to be excellent ground for fattening stock.

Of course, nothing is guaranteed, Mr Hollins said and, "reindeer are notoriously fickle and subject to population crashes." but he said he was personally delighted with the quality of camp, and genuinely amazed at how the reindeer have come on

"I also have great confidence in Leon Berntsen who is a stockman of high repute, has dedicated a large and valuable area of his land to the reindeer herd, and has taken a great personal interest.

Nobody could have done more to give them a chance of recovery

He added, "We can only hope that this is the turnaround we have been looking for

Royal visit

Holberg en route to Monte

THE trawler Holberg has left the Islands after it was successfully refloated last week.

She was towed out of Tamar Pass at lunchtime on Monday and was last seen by the Marine Officer, Jon Clark, being towed away at a speed of around five knots by the Mariana Rojamar II.

He believes the vessel is salvable: "I suspect they'll dry her out and we'll probably see her back here."

Luckily, the ship's auxiliary generator was higher in the engine room than the main engine and situated on the starboard side of the vessel, meaning it was not submerged. Within 24 hours of the refloatation of the Holberg, that generator was going again.

Mr Clark owed much of the success of the job to the "slow and painstaking" approach taken by the professionals involved, "which was done without creating any mess.

IT SEEMS some of the suggestions made in this column in recent weeks have come back to haunt us

Late last year I implored Stanley's drivers to exercise a little more patience on days when we are inundated with cruise ship visitors. Most not all - of the feedback I received was supportive but it now appears technology means these visitors are finding new ways to wind us up.

One example I learned of this week: Cllr Janet Robertson, who is living just a few yards from the Public Jetty, said she supported the idea of being nice to tourists but her patience was put to the test on Monday, when more than two thousand visitors were in town.

First of all, a rather large number let themselves into her garden to take some snaps with no apparent regard to the fact this was private property and, above all, someone's home; to top that off, while working on her laptop using her wireless internet connection. Janet looked out the window and saw a woman standing half way up the garden path with her own laptop out. It appears she had stumbled upon Janet's wireless connection, decided to tap into it and check her emails.

To her credit, Janet didn't storm out of the house, shotgun in hand and demand the woman 'get off my land' and instead had a quiet word, asking the lady to move along. However, she did ring me to remind me it's not always that easy to just smile and wave.

And then, last week. Sharon Jaffray, clutching at straws to find something to moan about in the New Year, mentioned the pot hole at Lookout Industrial Estate. This prompted a comment from a gentleman who works for the Public Works Department, who pointed out that so much money is being spent on the reparation of vandalism around Stanley, there aren't the funds left to repair said pothole.

In recent weeks, he said, we have suffered from gratuitous vandalism which is not only unsightly (when we are trying to raise the profile of the town) but is costing FIG and thus the taxpayer a small fortune to repair.

People are quick to blame the teens who like to walk the streets in the evenings, but I doubt that's fair. It's much more likely to be revellers on their way home from the pubs causing this damage. So, a New Year plea on behalf of PWD: it may seem like a really good

idea to nick a sign or to tip a bin over when you're heading home from a night out, but think twice. We all end up paying for this damage to be put right.

SO MUCH happened during 2006 that our annual review couldn't be compacted into the usual four page special. So we've had to split it into two installments, the second of which will feature next week.

And people still ask how we manage to fill our time in the Falklands!

THERE are two new faces behind the counter at the Lighthouse Seamen's Mission, although one may be rather familiar to a number of customers

Falkland Islander Betty Turner (nee McGill) and her husband Howard have taken over the role of managing the Mission from Ken and Mim Newton. Their initial contract is for two years but they have the option to extend and are clearly enthusiastic about the challenges that lie ahead.

The Mission is a popular venue for lunches and teas and customers can rest assured the culinary standard is as high as ever. In fact, Betty honed her baking skills under the watchful eye of her mother, Agnes Hoggarth, whose cooking is legendary in the Islands.

Betty left the Falklands in 1972 and first returned home in 1998. With her she brought Howard, who she met through church, to see what he thought of the Islands; he said he had to be dragged away after that first visit.

Living in Moreton on the Wirral, both worked in social care for a number of years, Betty as a care manager, latterly working with people with mental health difficulties, and Howard as a trainer in the resettlement of homeless people. He served with the Salvation Army for four years. Howard said the managerial role at the Mission offered the opportunity to do something they have wanted to do since they married - the chance to work together.

Howard commented: "We really appreciate the support we have received since we arrived, without which the Mission would not remain open.

Betty added, "We want people to know we're here and if there's anything we can do to support seafarers, please let us know

The primary purpose of the Mission is to service seamen and Betty and Howard said they would welcome the donation of any clothes for these men to use. Howard explained, "We tend to get plenty of women's and children's clothes, which is great because the fishermen send them home, but men's clothing is really needed."

The Mission is open to the public from Wednesday to Saturday 10am - 5pm and open to seamen from 9am to 9.30pm, and on Sundays from 12pm to 5pm (public) and 12pm to 9.30pm (seamen). on Mondays the Mission is open to seamen only from 5pm - 9.30pm and on Tuesdays from 12pm to 9.30pm.

C&W: 'Falklands laws will now cover novation agreements'

The provision regarding the governing law and jurisdiction was intended to provide "certainty of the novation and a consistent approach was taken in all the different countries involved in the C&W restructuring", Mr Richardson said.

Also, the provision related only to the novation letter itself, not to the existing service agreements between C&W and its users, all of which continue to be governed by and subject to the laws and jurisdiction specified in those contracts."

In light of concerns raised publicly about the convenience of English jurisdiction to the novation agreements, particularly on the burden it raises for customers to bring an action in England against C&W, and having consulted local lawyers, Mr Richardson said C&W is happy to amend its standard letter of assignment for all its Falkland Islands customers, "...and agree to it being governed by the laws of the Falkland Islands and subject to the courts of the Falkland Islands.

He added, "It is not our intention to undermine our continued investment and support of the Falkland Islands economy and local process.

"To that end, I would also like to take this opportunity to comment on our continued investment in the telecommunications and internet infrastructure on the Falkland Islands, and we look forward to shortly announcing some new and exciting products and services for our customers.

Court news

Taxi driver fined for injuring passenger

A TAXI driver has been found guilty of driving without due care and attention after he ran over a passenger in the Lookout Lodge carpark

After the day-long trial held yesterday, Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds fined Burned Peck (70) £200 for the offence. She said she was satistied there was no evidence or question of any deliberate act on his part, adding however, that it had been proven scientifically that his vehicle must have gone over Gavin Browning,

The court heard that on July 28, Mr Browning attended a reception at Government House in honour of the outgoing Governor, Howard Pearce

Mr Browning, giving evidence said he felt "normal" when he left Government House soon after 8pm having only consumed four whis-keys. Witnesses who travelled in the taxi with him, however, said they had ordered a taxi when they realised that Mr Browning, who fell over outside Government House, was not in a fit state to get home

The other guests had helped him into the taxi and asked Mr Peck to see that he got home safely when they left the vehicle.

Mr Browning travelled in the taxi driven by Mr Peck to Lookout Lodge - dropping the other passengers at Malvina House Hotel and the Victory Bar

Driving cases dominate court proceedings

FOUR driving offences were dealt with in the Senior Magistrates Court Wednesday. on

Cesar Esteban Marillican was fined a total of £1,075 after he pleaded guilty to charges of driving without insurance, without due care and attention, without a licence and taking a vehicle without the owners consent.

Mr Esteban took his friend's vehicle from the Narrows Bar on November 25 and crashed into a Mitsubishi parked on Davis Street. He was ordered to pay £70 pros-

ecution costs.

Faron Harvey Greentree entered a plea of guilty by post to a charge of speeding. Mr Greentree was observed by police carrying out static speed checks on the Mare Harbour Road travelling at a speed of 60mph. Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds

fined him £300 and £70 costs.

Ian Matthew Brock pleaded guilty to a charge of drink driving on December 28 on the Stanley to Darwin Road. Mr Brock provided a breath sample of 78 mg per 100 ml (35mg is the legal limit) after police noticed the smell of alcohol on him at the entrance gates to Mount Pleasant.

Mr Brock was disqualified from

Mr Browning said that when he of the tax he slipped under-neath it and Mr Peck drove off. He said his next recollection was being put into an ambulance.

Mr Browning said he had lost most of his right ear, had a 10cm cut to the left of his head resulting in 42 stitches and five hours in surgery.

The suit jacket Mr Browning was wearing, shown in court, had a tyre mark across the back.

Mr Peck said he had not run Mr Browning over. However, hair retrieved from the vehicle's mud flap and sent to the UK for forensic test-ing matched with Mr Browning's DNA. The hair had to have been placed with forceful abrasion, the forensic expert said.

In an interview with the police, Mr Peck said he could not explain how the hair had got on the mud flap of his car, but denied having run over the man. He said he had watched Mr Browning make his way towards vehicles parked outside the Lodge and had not noticed any bumps or anything untoward as he left the carpark.

Mr Browning was also awarded £300 compensation. Mrs Faulds said this was a "token" an indication that the court was sympathetic and that she hoped Mr Browning continues with a claim for compensation through other appropriate channels. Mr Peck was ordered to pay £250 costs.

The trial is listed for January 16 and is estimated to take 1-2 days.

There are a number of security measures the police are required to carry out during the Royal visit, which have been increased in recent years, "...as a result of world events."

Inspector Thomlinson of the Royal Protection Unit, who is the personal pro-tection officer of HRH visited the Falklands at the end of last year, inspected all the venues on the proposed programme and issued instructions as to the level of security required, Inspector McGill said. "This is what we have to aspire to, we have to reach those standards."

He said the police encourage mem-bers of the public to attend the various events and locations so they can see Princess Anne. "Officers will assist members of the public to the best vantage points. Our intention is not to get in anybody's way but to ensure the security arrange-ments are not breached."

Dozens of journalists to descend

A LARGE number of journalists are expected to descend upon the Falklands in the next few weeks, all with plans to file stories and images of the modern Islands in the 25th year since the war.

Three separate groups are due to visit: the first, arriving on January 22, will comprise mainly television crews from the BBC, Sky News and ITN. The group is ex-pected to number around 24 people

The second contingent of around fifteen people arrives on January 31 and is likely to be made up of daily newspaper journalists and a couple of ITN regional television crews. The size of the third group, scheduled to arrive on February 5. is unknown but will probably comprise reporters from the Sunday papers.

In a move to help provide information and administration services, the government has hired part of the Argos Building to set up as a media centre.

It will be managed by Pippa Lang from the Secretariat, overseen by Clerk of Councils Claudette Anderson, with help from the Falk land Islands Development Corporation and Tourist Board

Councillor Mike Summers said this move has been taken to ensure the journalists are, "... properly briefed and have the opportunity to see everything they want to see

and go every where they need to He said these visits are "ex-tremely important" adding, "it is part of the overall plan for the 2007 celebrations that these people come early to get some background information, footage and stories, at a time when we have better weather than that we might experience in June

"It will give them time to file some local stories and eatch up on Falklands developments since 1982

"It's important they therefore get the right briefing and see the right things.

Remembering Bob Ferguson 1926 - 2006 Plans underway for 2007 Forum

ROBERT John Ferguson (Bob, as he was better known) was born on Weddell Island on April 17, 1926.

Although the family lived on New Island, his mother had to travel to Weddell Island where the nearest midwife resided. Bob grew up on New Island with his parents John and Ethel, three sisters: Teen, Effie and Mary and his brother Finlay.

Bob led a full and varied life, and his love for the sea factored in almost every part of it. As with many young Falklands men, Bob had a number of jobs during his early working life, which included working on Weddell Island; at the Albemarle Sealing Station; a stint with Jack Barnes' Jetty Gang and the SS Fitzroy before joining the British Antarctic Survey, finishing up as Bosun on the RRS John Biscoe.

It was during this time that he met his future wife Thelma. Following a whirlwind romance, they were married at Warner's Holiday Camp in Seaton, Devon on September 2. 1958.

After they married Bob and Thelma returned to set up home in the Falklands. They were living on Weddell when John was born in 1960. After that the family moved to Thelma's homeland, in South Wales where Teena was born in 1962. Bob's heart however remained in the Falklands, and so they returned in 1963.

Firstly to Speedwell Island where he worked as skipper of the llen, then as farm mechanic at Fox Bay West before being offered the position of Manager of the Weddell Island Group in 1967

Yet again, the sea played a vital part in his life. As with many farms at that time - in order to work the numerous islands of the group and provide some independence, the schooner Weddell (also known as the MSW) was operated for many years, and Bob was renowned for being a professional and fearless skipper

He remained as manager of the Weddell Island Group until his son John returned from service in the Royal Navy in 1986, when he took over as manager from Bob.

When Weddell came up for sale the following year Bob and John bought the island between them and farmed it together. During this pe-



riod, Bob maintained his affiliation with the sea as they also owned and operated the AK Penelope for a number of years.

Despite having both hip joints replaced, Bob led a very active life for a number of years, including riding a motorbike over the most rugged parts of Weddell in order to assist with the farm work - despite his doctor's orders to the contrary!

Bob and Thelma finally retired to Stanley in late 1995.

Like many Falkland Islanders, Bob was deeply affected by the events of 1982, with his son at sea serving on HMS Endurance and his daughter, mother and other close relations being held at Goose Green until released by 2 Para. As a gesture of his appreciation, he and the small community at Weddell later donated a substantial sum to the South Atlantic Fund

Bob was also proud of his Scottish heritage, and visited the Western Isles and his sister Effie as often as he could.

Remembered for being cheerful, honest and hard working. Bob was adored by his family, had many friends and was known for being a 'true gentleman'

During the last couple of years Bob's health had deteriorated steadily and he was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease. Despite this, Bob passed away peacefully on Thursday. December 21 surrounded by his family.

Search and Rescue team help injured fisherman

THE Search and Rescue team from Mount Pleasant were in action last week

On January 3, an accident on board the fishing vessel Piscator led to a an emergency medical evacuation for an injured crew member.

A Hercules C130 and a Sea King were called out from Mount Pleasant to rescue a 32 year old Peruvian fisherman who had cut off two of his fingers in machinery on deck.

The *Piscator* had been operat-ing 95 miles north of West Falkland when the accident happened.

The Maritime Rescue Co-ordination Centre requested an emergency medical evacuation and the RAF rescue crews were tasked to transport the wounded man to medical assistance.

Captain Laura Evans of Media Operations said the C130 provided top cover for the rescue mission, locating the ship and then guiding the Sea King into place whilst providing a radio link throughout. "Once at the Piscator, the Sea King. captained by Flight Lieutenant Steve Smith, winched Sgt AD Brind onto the bow and lifted the casualty onto the helicopter.

The aircraft then flew directly back to KEMH where he received further treatment."

The Sea Kings have also been assisting with fire fighting duties this week. dropping over 25,000lbs of water onto Onion Range to combat ground fires.





"To their shame the Falkland Islanders, defying the forgiveness due for soldiers killed in active service, refuse to allow Argentine families to visit the graves of their husbands, sons and friends. This attitude is not what I and others who fought the war want.

For an intelligence officer he seems ignorant of the facts:-

1. Prior to 1999 several flights were organised direct from Argentina under the emblem of the International Red Cross for families. All appropriate assistance was kindly made this end by the Ministry of Defence and the Falkland Islands Government.

2. Since 1999 by Falklands agreement the weekly commercial Lan flight passes direct via Argentina twice a month to make it easier for Argentine families to visit, they are able to stay a week or more to fully visit memorials and battlefields.

3. FIG allowed a replica of the Buenos Aires memorial to be built at their Darwin Cemetery.

So Mr van der Bijl, next time you write and criticise others - do your intelligence work and research first.

A factual correction in a reprint would help. And, Mr van der Bijl, Islanders continue to be humane despite Argentinas campaign of an economic and communications war that continues against us, a people who they still refuse to recognise with any rights of democracy and existence.

Following a tense meeting of the Transport Advisory Committee it is agreed that a group should be formed to "sort out" plans for the interim ferry service between East and West Falkland. There was a heated discussion about the lack of progress of the proposed ferry service to be provided by Island Ship ping Ltd (ISL). Councillor Mike Rendell said he felt people were starting to give up on the service. An outline proposal is put to Camp residents and, following consultation it is decided a ferry service will be-gin on February 17.

Adventurer and father of seven Colin Yeates (47) from Chandlers Ford in Hampshire who was to attempt a single handed circumnavigation of the Antarctic runs aground within 36 hours of leaving Stanley, but considers giving it "another go.

The annual raft race in Stanley is a victory for the Powerhouse with the Leisure Centre in second place.

The report from an investigation into complaints about two members of the Royal Falkland Islands Police reaches the desk of the Attorney General who will decide whether to initiate a criminal prosecution. In late October 2005, Chief Police Officer Dave Morris and Sergeant Jonathan Butler were suspended on full pay. Three officers from the Metropolitan Police re-

turn to the Islands to conclude some detailed aspects of their investigations and the RFIP officers are charged with perverting the course of justice.

On West Falkland the construction of a bridge across the Chartres River is considered a logistical feat by the team led by Nunker Summers.

The government's chief fisheries scientist is hopeful that favourable environmental conditions will mean a reasonable illex fishery for the Falklands.

A run of bad luck begins when three Chilean members of the community are injured when their vehicle leaves the road and rolls near North Arm. An appeal to raise funds for popular taxi driver Maxi Balladeres is launched when he is medivacced to Montevideo in a critically ill condition. On West Falklands Gonzalo Hobman is trapped in a crashed vehicle at Fox Bay. A helicopter is scrambled to rescue him and at Hill Cove, Jen and Val Harvey's house is burned down by a fire thought to have started by an electrical fault.

Captain Chris Elliot MBE waves goodbye to his ship James Clark Ross for the final time ending an era that saw him at the helm of British Antarctic Survey ships for more than three decades.

John Birmingham and Louise Taylor are married in the Cathedral; Sara McPhee and Geoffrey Loftus are married at Kingsford Valley Farm while Stanley residents Martin Plato and Wendy Roberts travel to St Helena to tie the knot.

The Reverend Kathy Biles is ordained as a priest in the Anglican Church by the Right Reverend Stephen Venner, the Bishop of Dover

A new salon, Hair-do's, opens in the Beauchene complex and the Stanley Arms pub is under the new management of Carol Green and Phil Ovenden

After four years in the position of Director of Education, Sylvia Cole leaves the Islands. With her straight forward approach and refusal to mince words Mrs Cole has often been the target for criticism, particularly from parents.

February

FATHER and son television presenting duo, Peter and Dan Snow, are in the Islands filiming a one hour programme on the Falklands War, as part of a BBC series on battles of the twentieth century.

The Chief Justice, James Wood, retires from his role in the Falklands after an association with the Islands of over a decade.

Just a month after he achived racing hisotry in becoming the first Falkland Islands Bred horse to win both the Maiden Plate and Governor's Cup, Zafonic retained his unbeaten record at the Mini Sports

Tim Bonner was named Top Jockey at the end of the day.

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Flares are reported to have been spotted by the Royal Navy vesssel Dumbarton Castle while on patrol near South Georgia. Responding to rumours, Acting Governor Harriet Hall says there is "no reason to be-lieve" there was a submarine near the island at the time.

The Air Atlanta flight to Britain is delayed by four days after a vehicle being driven by a member of the ground staff collides with the aircraft,

Rower Colin Yeates announces he will embark a second time on his mission to circumnavitate Antarctica. However, this again ends in disaster and Mr Yeates is forced to call for help. He is taken back to Stanley on the fishery patrol vessel Dorada, and members of the Falkland Islands Defence Force on board use his row boat for target practice.

A previous winner of the Lon-don Marathon, Hugh Jones, visits to officially measure the Falklands marathon course and an Argentine swimmer becomes the first person to swim across Falklands Sound, completing the feat in one and a half hours

Councillors discuss a number of options for the future funding of higher and futher education, as guidance to a Task Group set up to look at changes in the way expenditure is allocated. Further education grants and means testing of grants and fees for higher education is favoured at this stage.

The Falkland Islands Rifle Club Bisley competition proves the per-fect exercise for Commonwealth Games representatives Ken Aldridge and Chris McCallum as they prepare for the Games in Melbourne next month. Also preparing for the games are Steve Dent, Gary Clement and Henry McLeod who receive specialist coaching from Australian advisors John Elfes and Stacy Roiall. The Games athletes are helped on their way by a £10,000 donation from Falklands Oil and Gas Ltd.

Half of councillors say they would like to follow the UK's lead and ban smoking in pubs and clubs,

An unidentified illness kills around 200 gentoo penguins in the Port Stephens area of West Falklands; Grant Munro of Falklands Conservation says intial indications are that the disease is an "avian pox virus".

The mother of Maxi Balladeres. the man injured in the accident near North Arm, writes to thank Falkland Islanders for their support for her son. She reports that he is still in a coma.

Councillors get together to discuss prospects for growth and quality of life issues in the rural sector. Cllr Hansen reports that the government will be working on some "quick wins" to provide immediate assistance to the Camp economy.

Calling the Falklands is to be axed, the BBC announces. Government Chief Executive Chris Simpkins says "the time has come to move on."

Rob Burnett interviews Nick Lambert, Captain of HMS Endurance. Responding to controversy caused by the ship's recent visit to the Argentine port of Ushuaia, Captain Lambert says. "There should be no doubt that we know how the ship is regarded in the Falkland Islands and South Georgia and this is factored into our plans."

The Islands are rocked by the death of sixteen year old Helen McKay at the end of the month. Helen died following a single vehicle accident on the North Arm Road.

March

THE two police officers who stand accused of perverting the course of justice enter pleas of not guilty. Judges and legal representatives will have to be sought from the UK and the date the trial will take place will be dependant on their availability.

The government and Stanley Services Ltd (SSL) reveal the formula used for fixing fuel prices. In a press statement Chief Executive Chris Simpkins says that SSL is required to maintain minimum stock levels and to fix prices in accordance with a detailed formula which ensures excess profits are not made and that, "...only SSL's reasonable costs in operating the fuel supply business are charged to consumers through the operation of the fuel price formula."

The BBC programme Calling the Falklands is discontinued to the consternation of some readers. However Councillor Summers assures that there was public consultation adding that the BBC did a survey here through FIBS and had no response at all. "While nobody asked the direct question should



AFTER more than 70 years in and around the Islands the 60ft auxiliary ketch *Penelope* is now officially registered in Germany and has reverted to her original name of *Feuerland*.

PWD announce that prepaid electricity 'meter cards' are to be withdrawn and Stanley householders moved back to a metered system.

Standing Finance Committee approves a request for £100.000 to be spent on capital investment in Stanley Dairy and Executive Council put the firearms review out for public consultation.

Additional funding of £65,000 is requested by the Falkland Islands Meat Company for the financial year 2005/ 06 on top of additional funding of £105,000 sought earlier in the year. At an FIDC board meeting Chief Executive Chris Simpkins comments that the situation is now that the FIMCo subsidy is likely to be more than what is going into the farming community.

Wool marketer, David Lambert, on a fact finding visit for FIDC says that double dumping bales and coretesting in the Islands will be among his recommendations. He says he has been looking at things like the fact that wool still goes to Bradford, where there is virtually no market for wool: "It's illogical to send it there," he says. His next step is to write a report for FIDC and make recommendations.

The Falklands-flagged trawler John Cheek is again fishing in home waters after being released by Argentine authorities. The vessel was arrested by the Argentine coastguard on February 20 for alleged illegal fishing in the Argentine zone. Petrel Trawling remain adamant the ship was operating over half a mile outside the Argentine 200 mile limit. The trawler was released following a "without prejudice" payment of an administrative penalty.

Councillors agree to reasonable enforcement' of the seatbelt law while, in the meantime, decisions are made on some controversial issues. Concerns stem from the fact that children cannot be carried in cars unless they are wearing a three point seatbelt as many vehicles have lap belts in the rear.

Stanley Marine Cadets perform well in a tough and challenging yomp from Teal Inlet to Stanley retracing the route of British Forces in the Falklands war.


FOLLOWING the passing of an amendment to the Road Traffic Ordinance in Legislative Council the existing seatbelt law now extends to all highways in the Islands.

In memory of former Falklands Governor

ERNEST Gordon (Toby) Lewis was born in New Zealand on 20 September 1918 and educated at Otago Boys' High School and Otago University.

He served with the Second New Zealand division in the Middle East from 1939 to 1946. He attained the rank of lieutenant – colonel, was mentioned in despatches and was awarded the MBE.

He married Jean Margaret Smyth in 1949.

He joined the Colonial Service in Nigeria in 1947 and was administrator of the Turks & Caicos Islands from 1955 to 1959, returning to Nigeria where he was permanent secretary to the Federal Ministry of Economic Development from 1960 to 1962.

He joined the CRO (subsequently the FCO) in 1962 and was first secretary in Islamabad from 1963 to 1966. From 1966 to 1969 he served in London, before becoming first secretary in Kuching, Sarawak from 1969 to 1970 after which he was appointed Governor of the Falkland Islands.

Mr Lewis was Governor from January 8, 1971 until January 20, 1975. The period was eventful, covering the evolution of the Communications Agreement.

While relations with Argentina were central, there was some developmental activity, and with fluctuating wool prices and rising costs there were successful efforts to keep the Falklands out of budgetary aid from the UK, coupled with institutional reform.

The Air Link

In June 1971 DA Scott, an under secretary in the FCO led a British delegation including Island representatives, in talks in Buenos Aires. This was preceded by Scott's visit to the Islands during which he was at pains to persuade Islanders of the advantages of air links and to reassure them that any arrangements would be under 'the sovereignty umbrella'.

The result of the talks was a Joint Statement under which the Argentines would provide a regular air service to be operated by amphibious aircraft pending the building by HMG of an airfield at Stanley to accommodate shorthaul airliners.

There were various important additional provisions, including the unpopular 'white card' for travel by Islanders to Argentina and the offer of scholarships in Argentina to children from the Islands. A sea service was to be maintained by the Falkland Islands Company (FIC), but the Darwin, which had traditionally provided the link with the mainland, was withdrawn as uneconomic in December 1971.

The amphibians started service on January 8, 1972 but, given the weather conditions, their limited pay-load, and their high operating costs, it was soon felt necessary to replace them with land planes. The Argentines offered to build an aluminium landing strip for this purpose. The proposal ran into local opposition mainly on the grounds that the strip would be an encroachment on sovereignty. It took extensive touring of the settlements by Governor Lewis and his chief secretary to swing Island opinion in favour of the proposal to which Councillors eventually agreed unanimously. Work began in May 1972 and the inaugural flight took place in November 1972.

A Peronist triumph in the March 1973 Argentine elections was to produce an immediate hardening of the Argentine line. Further inter-governmental talks, largely to discuss the operation of the Communications Agreement, between Britain and Argentina in April 1973 foundered.

The Argentines wanted to reintroduce discussion of the 1968 Memorandum of Understanding which had listed 'guarantees and safeguards' (full exercise of civil rights, use of the English language, etc) for Islanders in the event of the transfer of sovereignty. It had been abandoned by HMG after Lord Chalfont's visit to the Islands in October 1968. The FCO officials at the meeting were reluctant to take discussions very far on such a basis or to express a view without Ministerial approval.

While on leave in mid-1972 Governor Lewis was asked to advise on the dilemma now confronting HMG. He said he would have to see what people thought when he got back. He was nervous about going into talks 'with so few cards to play'.

On instructions on his return, Governor Lewis asked Councillors whether there should be a discussion about 'guarantees and safeguards' stressing that HMG had no intention of influencing Islanders in any way.

On October 25, 1973 Councillors agreed unanimously that, though dialogue should continue, it would be wrong for HMG to take the initiative. They maintained that despite all the benefits of the increased contacts with Argentina a majority of Islanders would vote to stay British.

YPF Agreement

The Argentines had proposed in September 1973 that YPF should supply petroleum products to the Islands at mainland prices on a monopoly basis. Governor Lewis had defended the proposed agreement in his address to Legislative Council on January 4. 1974. He particularly stressed the price advantage, a likely drop in the price of petrol from 82 pence to 36 pence a gallon and in diesel from 32 to 23 pence and the need for economic realism.

The FIC who had long collaborated with the Ministry of Defence in supplying most of the fuel in the Islands were deeply opposed to the change and claimed to HMG, with the support of the Falkland Islands Committee, that Councillors had been misled over



its advantages and that the installation was unsafe.

Their objections were overtaken by the change of government in London in February 1974. Both the Argentine and British governments appear to have been equally keen to sign the Agreement despite the deterioration in their relations. Governor Lewis emphasised to Legislative Council the role of the Agreement in strengthening relations with Argentina. It certainly strengthened Argentina's economic influence and involvement in the Falklands.

Modernisation and development

With a brief from the FCO to modernise FIG, Governor Lewis took an active interest in the internal government of the Falklands. He began by focusing on the Falklands' financial plight, caught in the classic squeeze of falling prices for their sole export, wool, and rising prices for imports, resulting in regular budget deficits and reliance on reserves to balance the books. He spoke of the need to scrutinise estimates of expenditure more closely than hitherto and the need 'to take a fresh, hard look at all established institutions'.

The wool price rose steadily from the catastrophic figure of 33.5 pence per kilo in 1971 to 110.5 pence per kilo in 1974, but Governor Lewis continued throughout his time to argue for budgetary stringency. In particular he emphasised the need to prevent the Falklands ever requiring a grant-in-aid from the UK, underlining the degree of scrutiny which this would involve.

By the time he left, the Falklands were producing a budgetary surplus, avoiding the need to plunder their reserves and banishing the spectre of grant-in-aid. This was partly the result of better wool prices but, more significantly, reflected increased revenues, unpopular but necessary increases in taxation and better control of costs.

Governor Lewis decided that the Falklands practice of having joint meetings of the Executive and Legislative Councils should cease and the two Councils would in future have separate meetings. His view was that the joint system inhibited public debate in Legislative Council because so much had been decided in meetings of Joint Council.

He also urged Executive Council members to be more forthright in defending policies which they had agreed rather than taking refuge in confidentiality.

Economic progress, as always in the Falklands, was to some extent an affair of false starts, wheels reinvented and hopes deferred. A major disappointment of Governor Lewis's time was Alginate Industries' decision not to pursue their scheme for large-scale kelp processing, but trial fishing by the Japanese firm Taiyo began and high hopes rested on a report by Dr Leslie Stewart on the prospects for an inland trout fishery. A first consignment of 20,000 sheep was exported to the mainland. A new power station was opened in Stanley. There were promising increases in the number of tourists and the beginnings of conservation legislation. Most important of all was probably the eventual com-mitment of £4.2 million by British Aid for the building of what was to become Stanley Airport, a commitment under the Communications Agreement.

Though he had a distinguished colonial administrative background, Lewis was the first diplomat appointed as governor, for which he was regarded with some suspicion. Invariably loyal to govemment policy on Argentina as the FCO twisted and turned to keep the Argentines 'in play' he seems to have gone to considerable pains to explain the rationale for each new step to Islanders.

He appeared genuinely to think that contact and collaboration with Argentina was the best way ahead. He was at the same time mindful of Island opinion and firm on sovereignty. As he said (in LegCo, January 4, 1974): "I stand for a community which, while safeguarding its sovereignty, is prepared to play its part in the world, particularly with our closest neighbour. Argentina and with other countries in the great Latin American continent."

Governor Lewis was generally liked, an excellent host who enjoyed entertaining with his wife, known as 'Lady Lou'. Although he appeared frail, he took early morning walks on the race course where he dispatched golf balls hither and yon with great gusto.

He returned to the FCO as head of the Gibraltar and General Department, retiring in 1977. He was appointed OBE in 1958 and CMG in 1972.

He passed away on December 29 and his remains are to be cremated at Putney Vale on January 16


FIPASS was busy with visitors over the last week



ltems on the agenda before con-sideration of applications for planning permission and building per-mits included one on TV and radio aerials, and members were informed that regulations had been drafted which were now with the Acting Attorney General before being for-warded to Executive Council (ExCo) for consideration. The Dockyard Development Brief had now been amended to include comments received and was also to be forwarded to ExCo for adoption.

Moving on to applications de-ferred at previous meetings, members were advised no progress had been made on Joan Bound's application in principle for the construct tion of a dwelling to the rear of 10 Barrack Street so it was again deferred, as was the proposed mast and equipment hut for Cable and Wireless to the south of the FIDF HQ it was understood that the applicants are shortly to meet the Director of Civil Aviation for discussions on the proposal.

Also deferred again was Brendan Gara's proposed hatchery demonstration unit he wishes to establish on government land at Moody Brook - more information had been received but the application is to be discussed further



OAS members support Insulza

THE Secretary General of the Organisation of American States (OAS) Jose Migule Insulza has received full support from representatives during a debate promoted by Venezuela following controversy with Venezuelan president Hugo Chavez.

The support came during a regu-lar session of the OAS Permanent Council, composed of the ambassadors of member-states, following Chavez' attacks on Insulza for commenting on the potential non-re-newal of a broadcasting license to a private TV channel RCTV.

However the Chilean press reports that Venezuelan Minister of Foreign Affairs Nicolas Maduro, interviewed by phone in Caracas, re-affirmed Chavez statements and warned that whoever meddles in Venezuelan affairs will be exposed to a harsh reply.

As long as he respects the principles of self-determination and sovereignty and does not attempt to make the OAS Secretariat into a colonies ministry, we will have good political relations with Insulza.

"But, as happened a few days ago, if he attempts to interfere in affairs which are exclusively Venezuelan he will receive a harsh reply because sovereignty for us is sacred," said Maduro. The Venezuelan official went

further and said that if "Insulza does not retract his statements he will have to leave the OAS, because the time when OAS was managed by the United States imperialist power is

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over. Nobody gives us orders, only the sovereign peoples of our coun-tries," he underlined.

Maduro added that in Venezuela there is a "democratisation" process in the media with "hundreds of community television channels, hundreds of radios, thousands of community newspapers, so we are undergoing a process of expansion and democratization of the media with strict respect for freedom of speech

Insulza who was present during the debate did not participate and had announced previously he would not reply to Chavez' insults, who

not reply to charge insults, who publicly called him an "idiot" "I'm not willing to be involved in a match with the president of any member state," said Insulza dur-ing a meeting of the Inter American Dialogue.

Insulza did say during the mom-ing forum that he was abiding by the charter of OAS as the head of OAS, following the 2001 Inter American Democratic Charter.

'Fundamental components of the exercise of democracy are transparency n governments' activities: probity, governance, re-spect for social rights and the freedom of speech and freedom of the press.

Shipping lines increase capacity by 14 %

MOELLER-MAERSK and 407 other shipping lines increased their capacity to move containers by 14 percent in 2006. the fastest pace in six years, data from Containerisation International showed. Capacity at the world's shipping

lines rose to 11.31 million 20-foot containers in 2006, based on numbers posted on Containerisation International's Web site. The capacity increase was the big-gest since the industry information provider started compiling the data in July 1999

Hyundai Heavy Industries and other South Korean shipyards have received record orders in the last three years, prompted by expanded global trade and increased demand to explore and trans-port oil and gas. Global trade is forecast to grow 7.6 percent in 2007, the International Monetary Fund said.

"Cargo will grow, but capacity will grow a bit faster," this year, said Peter Hilton, an analyst at Credit Suisse in Hong Kong. "There's a lot of talk about pushing rates up. Supply and demand imbalance makes that a bit questionable.

Maersk, Mediterranean Shipping and other sea carriers have been charging less to move cargo since the second half of 2005 as a record number of new vessels are delivered. The equivalent of about 38 percent of the current container ship fleet is on order, according to Containerisation International


Shipyards in South Korea, which won almost half of the global orders last year, have a record US\$90.3 billion worth of vessels on backlog. Capacity at China Ocean Shipping's

container shipping unit, Cosco Container Lines, increased 26 percent last year to 390.354 boxes, overtaking Evergreen Marine to become the biggest Asian container shipping line, based on Containerisation International's data. The capac-ity of Evergreen, based in Taiwan, in-creased nine percent to 377,334 boxes.

China Shipping Container Lines's fleet size rose 15 percent to 387.168 boxes last year. Hanjin Shipping, the biggest South Korean shipping line, increased 8.7 percent to 337,378 containers

Nippon Yusen, the largest Japanese shipping line, expanded its capability 11 percent to 283,109 last year. Neptune Orient Lines's container unit increased its capacity by 5.9 percent to 342,461 hoxes

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

CE: no truth to 'ferry fall out' story

THE Chief Executive has rubbished a rumour of a falling out between the government and the military over the use of the proposed cross sound ferry service, and says that in fact he is about to open talks on how it will work

He was responding to a query from Penguin News, asking whether the military was no longer intending to use the ferry

He confirmed there had been no falling out with the military as far as the government was concerned. "My latest discussions (before Christmas) revealed that they intend to use it and I will shortly be opening discussions on detail, including charges.

He added that there is a great deal of work going on behind the scenes regarding the design of the ferry terminals which, "...as I have previously stated, will be submitted to the Transport Advisory Committee.

The contract with Workboat Services Ltd is in the course of being prepared and, Mr Simpkins said, at the moment there is no reason to believe that the original plan for the vessel to be operational by July 1 as planned will not be achieved. However he added, "... there is a great deal to be done. All involved are working hard to make sure it happens."

Attorney General's departure

Mr Simpkins yesterday confirmed that the Attorney General, Melanie Chilton, is due to leave the Islands on January 23. Mrs Chilton tendered her resignation in mid December, less than two months after officially taking up the top legal job.

Ros Cheek will continue as Acting Attorney General while efforts are made to recruit a locum, Mr Simpkins said, and a lo-cum Crown Counsel is currently in post. The process to recruit a permanent replacement for Mrs Chilton has begun he said, and, ... subject to suitable applications being received, the selection process is expected to commence at the beginning of March.

Mr Simpkins added that - "as was always intended" - former Attorney General David Lang will be undertaking some work to assist with the backlog of legislative drafting.

Relocated reindeer 'doing well'

THE National Reindeer Herd seems to be doing well in its new home near Cape Meredith, vet Joe Hollins has said.

Last week Penguin News reported on a population crash in the herd and its subsequent move from Hill Cove to Albemarle, where the animals' initial response has been "good", Mr Hollins said.

He said he was grateful to Pe-ter Nightingale of West Lagoons for his "expertise and sheer hard work" in the capture of the animals from Hill Cove.

Mr Hollins said the reindeer had initially performed well at Hill Cove in an area that other stock thrive in. "The population crashed unexpectedly over just three months, and the Nightingales reacted immediately by expediting their removal to camp near Cape Meredith, with its unusual abundance of reindeer-appropriate foods.

THE team at Gilbert House and the Royal Falkland Islands Police undoubtedly breathed an enormous sigh of relief as the big red plane left with its special passengers on Sunday evening bound for Antarctica.

The visit went off with no major security breaches - not even a stray egg and Princess Anne received a warm reception from those she met. So why is there such a feeling of anti-climax about the visit?

I wish I could put it down to the atrocious weather which afflicted the weekend - gale force winds, rain and general chilliness are not conducive to a happy demeanour or cheery photo opportunities - but are the elements really to blame?

At the Town Hall reception on Saturday, people commented on the small number of Falkland Islanders present - the sea of green presented by visiting military only served to accentuate the lack of civvies - and the service at the Liberation Monument attracted a 'crowd' of around ten onlookers. Compare that to the images of Prince Charles' visit in 1999, at which hundreds of people gathered at a number of venues around town for a glimpse of the Royal. I was not alone in my relief that overseas press had not accompanied the Princess.

So why the lack of interest? Princess Anne previously visited the Islands around ten years ago for more than a week; does she not, therefore, have the appeal of a previously unsighted Royal?

This can't be right; at the Stanley reception, while the small number of Islanders present were genuinely embarrassed at the turn out, none sug-gested the problem was attributable to apathy towards the Princess Royal.

Instead, most in fact felt that people were daunted by the requirement to reserve tickets for the event and by the instructions on how to address the Royal visitor. If my memory serves me correctly, however, this was un-changed from Prince Charles' visit so it still doesn't explain why so few bothered to turn out.

Can readers shed any light on this? Is there something the organisers of such important events could learn from the weekend, particularly as we are in a year of commemoration which is expected to receive another Royal Visit?

I'M grateful to Leiv Poncet for his letter (page 7) and also to the Director of Agriculture, Phyl Rendell, for providing some financial information about the National Reindeer Herd.

Mrs Rendell understands that around £250,000 was invested in the project, which was taken on by FIDC in an effort to find ways of diversifying agriculture. This covered all the costs related to housing the animals at Saladero in the first instance. Material not used at Saladero, such as fencing, was used on West Falkland to make a deer proof fence.

That all sounds rather sensible, until you compare the government's sum with the Poncet family's expenditure in establishing the flourishing



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Royals explore Falklands and Antarctica

A FORECAST of poor weather meant a shortened Falklands visit for the Princess Royal.

Taking advantage of a 'weather window', the princess left the Islands aboard a British Antarctic Survey (BAS) Dash 7, more than twelve hours earlier than planned.

She left for her fact-finding trip to British Antarctic Territory at 6pm on Sunday, heading for Rothera

The Princess and her husband, Rear Admiral Timothy Laurence arrived in the Falklands on Friday afternoon and, despite poor weather, had a packed schedule for the next two days which began with a trip to Fitzroy for a wreath laying ceremony and a chance to chat to residents.

The Royal couple flew to Saunders Island on Saturday morning to visit penguin and al-batross colonies. Director of Fisheries for South Georgia, Harriet Hall briefed them on the impact unregulated fishing practices are having on the global black browed albatross population.

From Saunders, the party flew to Hill Cove to attend a busy reception with West Falklands residents before flying back to Stanley.

The Princess and Rear Admiral Laurence then attended a reception in the Town Hall where they met a cross section of the community, including a large contingent from Mount Pleasant.

Sunday morning began with a short wreath laying ceremony at the Liberation Monument then the princess attended a service at Christ Church Cathedral, during which she read a lesson.

She then had the chance to meet a large number of children from the Sea Cadets and Guide and Scouting organisations in the Parish Hall.

Princess Anne was impressed by a special display put on in the hall which linked all the youth organisations through a Falklands theme, flowing from the sea to beaches, onto Camp with its wildlife and then into town.

Brainchild of Guides Commissioner Ruth Taylor and Cub leader Jan Miller, the backdrop conveyed Falklands life, both contemporary and traditional. (*)

Before boarding her early flight, the Princess Royal embarked on a tour of the Fishery Patrol Vessel Pharos then had lunch with invited guests at the Seamen's Mission; her final engagements were meetings with representatives of the business sector and tourism and conservation

Antarctic visit

During her visit south, Princess Anne had the opportunity to see first-hand the world-leading research carried out by British scientists living and working in Antarctica.

BAS Director, Professor Chris Rapley CBE, introduced the Princess to around 100 science and support staff and briefed her on the importance of Antarctica's role in global environmental issues such as climate change and ozone depletion.

The Royal visit takes place on the eve of International Polar Year (2007-08) - 50 years on from International Geophysical Year (1957-58) when, her father, the Duke of Edinburgh visited the Antarctic Peninsula.

Princess Anne then, in her capacity as Patron of the UK Antarctic Heritage Trust, joined the Royal Navy's ice patrol vessel HMS Endurance to visit a number of the historic British sites in the Antarctic Peninsula area to inspect conservation work being undertaken by the Trust.

Court news

Guilty verdict for aiding sexual assault

FOLLOWING a two day trial, a young Stanley man has been found guilty of aiding and abetting a friend who sexually assaulted a young woman.

Simon Ladron De Guevara (20) was charged in May with aiding and abetting the commission of sexual penetration without consent by Raul Hernandez on March 11, 2006. Mr Hernandez slipped bail after he was medivacced to Chile and has

Mr Hernandez slipped bail after he was medivacced to Chile and has failed to return to the Islands. A warrant has been issued for his arrest.

The prosecution alleged that Mr De Guevera held the complainant's hands behind her back while Mr Hernandez assaulted her.

Crown Counsel Robert McMasters said the assault happened in a bedroom at the complainant's home. She had gone there with friends for a small party after an evening in the pub. The complainant was in a bedroom with a group of friends when someone switched the light off.

Three of the people left the room, leaving the complainant and a girlfriend in the room with the two men. Mr Hemandez lay on top of the friend and Mr De Guevera was on top of the complainant. The complainant heard her friend say "get off me" and then flee the room.

The complainant tried to get to the door but Mr Hernandez beat her to it. The prosecution alleged that Mr De Guevera then grabbed her from behind and placed her between himself and Mr Hernandez. In a taped interview with police, the complainant said. "I was scared - I just froze", and while Mr De Guevera held her, Mr Hernandez carried out the assault.

A male friend of the girl tried to open the door to the bedroom but found it was blocked. Eventually he forced his way in and the complainant fled.

Taking the stand during the trial. Mr Ladron De Guevara maintained that there had been no sexual assault that he was aware of, saying that Mr Hernandez and the complainant had been close together, standing kissing in the middle of the room.

He said that he approached the couple and placed his hands on the complainant's waist from behind; they were all three moving as if dancing, he said, when he heard two of the party guests laughing outside the door. Mr De Guevara said he moved towards the door as it was kicked open leaving a 14 inch square hole in it. He said they all had a drink, listened to music, watched a movie and ate before he went home at about 3am.

Defence lawyer Keith Watson said that there had been inconsistencies throughout the evidence, in particular as to where the complainant was in the room at the time the door was kicked open.

One witness had said the complainant was on the bed with Mr Hernandez which, Mr Watson said, gave little creditability to the complainant's evidence; she said she was by the door with the two men.

He said the complainant had also stated that she had told two of the witnesses about the alleged event almost immediately afterwards however one said in interview that she could not remember seeing the complainant while the other said she had been told of the event a couple of weeks later.

Mr Watson said this was not just bad memory but crucial evidence, which had been "contradicted by her two friends." He put it to the court that something did occur in the bedroom that may have caused fear and distress to the girls but that the major event that lead to the hearing was not corroborated.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said that she was satisfied beyond all reasonable doubt that Raul Hernandez had committed an offence of sexual touching and that on the evidence put before her she had no reasonable doubt that Mr De Guevara aided and abetted in the offence. Mrs Faulds added, however, that she was not satisfied that sexual penetration had been proven; she was specifically referring to the incident near the door and was discounting earlier evidence of, "horseplay."

She said she viewed it as a classic party situation where too much alcohol had blurred the boundaries of appropriate and inappropriate behaviour.

The case was adjourned until February 5 for a date for sentencing to be fixed and a presentence report to be prepared.

Hefty fine for drink driving seaman

AN OFFICER from the MV Tamar was fined £1,720 after he took his friend's car on a drunken drive through Stanley on December 16

Marius Lucinskas (25) pleaded guilty to taking a vehicle without the owner's consent, drink driving and driving without a licence or insurance on Wednesday.

Crown Counsel Robert McMasters told the court that soon after midnight on December 16, police received information that a vehicle was being driven by a possible drink driver on Ross Road West.

Police went to the area where they saw a car belonging to Stevie Bonner weaving along the road. When stopped Mr Lucinskas got out of the car but had to steady himself by holding onto the roof of the car.

A road side breath test gave a positive result and a later test at Mount Pleasant gave a lower reading of 86 mg of alcohol per 100 ml of breath (the legal limit is 35mg).

When interviewed by police Mr Lucinskas immediately admitted taking his friend's car when he had returned to his ship at FIPASS earlier that evening saying that he wanted to practice his driving on the dock. In mitigation Keith Watson said

In mitigation Keith Watson said that his client was due to leave the Islands to return to Lithuania after four months in and around the Islands. He said Mr Lucinskas was the author of his own misfortunes but was not asking to be treated any differently because he was due to leave the Islands the following day.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds fined Mr Lucinskas £700 for the drink driving offence, £100 for driving without a licence, £250 for driving without insurance, £600 for taking the vehicle without the owner's consent plus £70 prosecution costs.

Obituary: remembering Terry Peck MBE

TERENCE John Peck was born at Stanley on August 2, 1938, to James and Nellie Peck, brother to Tony, Pat, Robert, Norcen, Eunice Joan and Illeen.

Early years in Stanley in the junior and senior schools gained him the reputation of being a bit of a scrapper if the need arose, usually in defence of some other less fortunate person. He was known by the nickname of 'Boots' due to wearing his brothers' Wellingtons several sizes too big and turned down at the top like most of the other lads of that time wore them.

His first job was at Ajax Bay with his brother Pat, along with nowadays a rapidly diminishing number of survivors including Ken Keenleyside. It was ironic that he should have been involved in the building of the freezer plant which many years later was to play such an important part in the events of the 1982 War as the British field hospital.

Later he served an apprenticeship with the PWD as a plumber which throughout his later life was to at times become a bit of a nuisance as he was, no matter what his position, often called on to fix people's pipes or central heating.

Although plumbing was a serious job, it did not offer much in the way of challenge or excitement so he changed course to make a career in the Police Force which involved training at the UK Police colleges at Peel House and Bramshill, resulting in eventually being appointed Chief Police officer and being awarded the Colonial Police medal for meritorious service.

It was an eventful career with some notable occasions including one Christmas in the 1970s, while going out to assist and bring back a family whose home in the North Camp had been destroyed by fire. This involved a ten hour overland drive and, unknown to many people involved, his return to Stanley seriously ill with only very little blood left in his system. Another Christmas was spent organising a successful search, again in the North Camp, for Sharkey Anderson, who had gone missing on horseback on Christmas Eve. This involved the use of one of HMS *Protector's* helicopters.

Another occasion which had its moments was his involvement along with his small Police Force in the Argentine DC4 hijacking in 1967 where he made an unusual escape by hiding under the Revd Peter Milam's cloak.

Perhaps he is best remembered for his leadership in organising a diving search to locate and recover the body of FIGAS pilot Ian Campbell after a tragic accident with a Beaver aircraft at Mare Harbour. This was carried out with a group of local volunteers against fierce opposition from the government of the time.

Policing under Terry Peck's management was conducted in the old time manner without a lot of fuss and bother. Those who had had too much to drink were bundled into the back of the Police Land Rover and delivered home and the next day given fair warning that if that sort of behaviour was to become a habit then they would have to face the consequences.

Young tearaways and hooligans were given similar treatment; the stroppier ones often got a clip around the ear and a severe warning. There are today a number of folk who are grateful to him for this common sense approach in a small community to problems in their young days.

During the years of Terry's police service, there was sadly no recognition by the local government of any social welfare problems. The establishment put their heads in the sand and hoped the problems would go away; if it didn't, they passed the problem over to the police to sort out.

This often involved considerable work for the force, well beyond the normal policing duties. Here, again, there are folk who remain grateful for the involvement of Terry and



his officers with their problems. He never turned anyone away.

There were no favours though. On one occasion he took his brother-in-law to Court for not paying his dog licence. He was fined $\pounds S$ and got a severe dressing down from Magistrate Harold Bennett.

After retirement from the police force on grounds of ill health, Terry entered the world of politics and served on both Legislative and Executive Councils. He represented the Falklands on several occasions overseas.

Although less physically robust than policing, the world of politics provided many opportunities for a good scrap. Terry possessed that uncanny knack of being able to smell out if local government was about to sweep anything under the carpet, and at other times if the British government was likely to pull a fast one and sell the Falklands down the river.

Quite a lot of feathers were ruffled during those days. His motto seemed to be 'do it first and face the flack afterwards'. He did not suffer fools gladly; some of the old brigade from that time must have dreaded him. Terry's involvement in the events of 1982 have been recorded and documented in many ways. He, along with a good number of other local people, linked up with the Task Force to carry out many brave and dangerous operations in support of the British forces.

Being wanted by the occupying Argentine forces, he left Stanley with a motorbike and some supplies to spend some three weeks living rough in the Camp, being helped during the nights by folk who took him into their isolated homes for a bath and a good feed. Apparently on one of these bathing occasions he was given a rubber duck to amuse himself with and this later became his radio call sign which no doubt confused the Argentines who were closely monitoring all radio transmissions. He also managed to realign one of the settlement airstrips into a bog in case the Argentines decided to use it.

He eventually linked up with 3Para and his work with them was recognised by the Parachute Regiment awarding him the privilege of wearing their red beret on ceremonial occasions - his most treasured award.

In later years afterwards, the stress and trauma of being involved in what has been described as one of the bloodiest battles of the war on Mt Longdon resulted in his having many months of treatment in Post Traumatic Stress hospitals in England.

He was always very conscious of the fact that for many people involved during that time, the mental scars would remain open and with them for the rest of their lives.

The last years before retirement were spent continuing his interest in the welfare of young people by managing with his wife Eli the YMCA in Stanley and setting up the South Atlantic Medal Association.

Terry was awarded the MBE in 1983 and died after a brave battle against terminal cancer during which he never once complained, on December 30, 2006. JS

Youth fined for allowing friends to drive his car

A YOUNG man was fined a total of £600 in the youth court on Friday, after he admitted to three charges each of permitting someone to drive his vehicle without insurance and without a licence.

The incident which occurred on December 8, came to light after damage to a building at the Beauchene carpark, consistent with a vehicle having hit it, was reported.

A police officer had noticed damage to the front of the youth's vehicle and when asked about it, he said that it was an accident that occurred because he was not familiar with an automatic vehicle.

He later spoke to another police officer saying that he had lied and a female who had been a passenger in his vehicle that night had been driving.

The youth further admitted

that he was not aware that the tyred area near Stanley Airport was designated and had let a male friend of his, who held a provisional licence, drive; he was also unaware that he was not able to accompany a provisional driver as he had not held his licence for the required two years.

The young man then also let a girlfriend of his, who he knew to have driven before, drive in the tyred area. A third passenger insisted that she drive from the Chandlery carpark - the youth said he did not give express permission and she proceeded towards the Beauchene carpark. The youth said that he shouted "brake" as the vehicle was going too fast and the driver possibly panicked and accelerated, hitting the side of a building in the Beauchene complex.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds told the youth that she had taken into account that he had not been in trouble before, however she added that he had behaved in an extremely irresponsible way on the night in question.

She said she hoped the boy had taken on board the seriousness of driving without insurance and fined him $\pounds 100$ for each offence plus $\pounds 70$ prosecution costs.

The girl who was driving the vehicle at the time of the accident had previously admitted to charges of driving without a driver's licence or insurance and appeared in court on the same day.

Her case was adjourned until February 8, when two other cases (one of which is a trial) are to be considered. As a pre-sentence report is in the process of being prepared her legal representative suggested that it could be "tweaked" so as to be relevant to this case too.

Farewell to former Governor

THE Governor's sword and cocked hat lay on the coffin of former Governor Ernest Gordon (Toby) Lewis at his funeral at Putney Vale Cemetery in London on Tuesday.

Mr Lewis had no family in England and his wife Jean died in 2003 but messages were read from his sister and her family in Australia and the service was attended by neighbours, former colleagues and carers.

Among those present were Sukey Cameron, the Falklands Government's Representative in London, Major Sam Bassett from the defence staff of the New Zealand High Commission (recalling Mr Lewis's distinguished service with the New Zealand army during World War II), Mr David Taylor, former Chief Executive and author of the essay on Mr Lewis in the Dictionary of Falklands Biography, and Mr David Tatham, another former governor. The funeral arrangements were made by a neighbour of Mr Lewis.

New charity job for C&W stalwart

AFTER more than three decades with Cable and Wireless, Brian Summers says goodbye to the telecommunications company this week.


Brian started with the company in 1974, when Cable and Wireless officially took over the Falklands' telecommunications. He was signed on as a Senior Operator with a pay of £1,500 per annum, and remembers that international telephone calls were limited to one hour per day.

In 1980 Brian was promoted to Operations Supervisor. He recalls being on duty on the night of the Argentine invasion. He had started his shift at 10pm and was still on duty when gunfire and explosions started in the early hours of the morning. He played a major part in keeping communications going for Government House; he was arrested on April 26 and spent the rest of the conflict at Fox Bay

Brian recalls that after the war approximately 3000 telegrams were sent in the first week after liberation. International telephone calls were then operated between 9am to 6pm and people had to book ten minute slots two weeks in advance.

The Earth Station came into operation in 1983 and the first direct dial calls became available. In 1988 Brian was promoted to Assistant Manager Commercial then in 1996 he became Manager Commercial and Operations.

In April 2000 he was again promoted, this time to Business Unit Manager. During the management restructure in 2004 Brian became the Traffic Manager for the three South Atlantic islands (Falkland Islands, Ascension Island and Si

Helena Island). From May 2006 he has been Acting CEO and temporary HR Manager. Away from Cable and Wireless,

Conservationists: Falklands fishery is 'seabird friendly'

AROUND the world there are plenty of examples of unnecessary by-catch of seabirds and marine mammals within commercial fisheries, but the Falklands is an example of what can be achieved when fisheries, companies, crews and conservationists work together.

Seabirds are attracted to fishing vessels by a free meal. However, in many incidences many get accidentally hooked or entangled in the fishing gear and die. In the last six years since observers began their work on longline vessels they have recorded a ten-fold decrease in seabird mortality.

Consolidated Fisheries Ltd, which operates the two long-line vessels targeting Patagonian toothfish, work closely with the Falkland Islands Fisheries Department (FIFD) and Falklands Conservation to ensure that seabird friendly fishing practices are adhered to. Seabird mortality estimates are calculated annually using data collected by dedicated FIFD seabird observers.

Sarah Crofts of Falklands Conservation explains: "The most recent annual estimates for 2005/06 estimated that only 16 black-browed albatrosses were killed in the long-line fishery. If all fisheries in the southern oceans could achieve such levels then the future of the endangered black-browed albatross would be a lot brighter.

"To take account of different levels of fishing effort between years estimates and targets are usually presented as the seabird catch for a given number of set hooks. The current mortality rate of 0.002 birds killed per 1.000 hooks achieves the target set in the five-year National Plan of Action - Seabirds a year ahead of schedule and relates to a ten-fold decrease in mortality over the last six years and an even more staggering 265 fold decrease from when the fishery was first established in 1995."

These latest figures are extremely encouraging and demonstrate a well-managed responsible fishery can almost eliminate the accidental by-catch of seabirds. The techniques, using bird-scaring lines, integrated weighted fishing lines so they sink quickly out of reach of birds, and other measures are inexpensive but require the interest, willingness and dedication of the crews to be effective.

The crews of Consolidated Fisheries Lid's (CFL) Gambler and Valiant, especially Jose Manuel Sanchez Lema, Domingo Duran Vilar, Candido Sanchez Lema and Gabriel Cabalerio Pastoriza, should be congratulated for their continuing efforts. Whilst the FIFD seabird observers who work alongside the crews at sea, currently Justine Jury and Katja Janzen, have also played a key part in achieving the target ahead of time.

Cheryl Roberts, chairperson of CFL responded saying, "Since late 1994 CFL has been working on vessel management and seabird mortality mitigation measures to achieve the results obtained in 2005 and 2006. With help and encouragement from FIFD, Falklands Conservation and our officers on board, by trialling different torf-lines and weights, and by an ongoing process of education, we are truly thrilled that we have helped the Falklands achieve the excellent reputation for conservation measures that it has around the world."

Richard Davies added, "A huge amount of effort over the last few years is testament to this concrete measure of success, and continues to show the world that the Falklands take seabird mitigation and conservation issues seriously."

The Falklands is the world stronghold of the endangered black-browed albatross, and halting their current decline has been a major focus for Falklands Conservation in recent years. Collaborative work with the FIFD and the fishing industry, has taken a pro-active stance to monitor and address seabird mortality across all the Falklands fisheries from longlining to trawling and jigging.

Successes have not only been seen in the longline fishery. Work in the trawl fishery resulted in the design, trialling and final adoption of bird-scaring lines across the trawl fleet, and has achieved a 90% decline in seabird deaths associated with this fishing activity.

Such achievements if they are sustained will have far-reaching positive impacts on albatrosses and petrels breeding and foraging around the Falklands. However, whilst the advances that have been made locally are fantastic, albatrosses from the Falklands forage over vast areas of ocean and can only be fully protected at an international scale.

Grant Munro, director of Falklands Conservation concluded, "With Falklands Conservation and the Falklands fishing industry at the forefront of mitigation research worldwide it is imperative that we use our contacts and influence to provide guidance and encouragement to other fisheries on the Patagonian shelf and in international waters to adopt similar practises and ensure that albatross remain one of the enduring symbols of the southern oceans."

Housing plots identified

THE government has identified around 40 potential housing plots in Stanley which can be released over the next two or three years.

Councillor Richard Davies says some of the plots are almost ready for release, "...and some need a bit more work – such as service work." The Lands Committee has been tasked to come up with a definitive list of the plots, and a time table for their release.

However, any plots released will be more expensive to buy than those which were sold in the East Stanley Development, Clir Davies said. He explained, "We have been clear in the last two years that the government cannot afford to subsidise to the extent it did in East Stanley. On the other hand it is generally felt that some degree of assistance is going to be required. We will probably come up with some sort of formula for selling government plots which will be related to the cost of infrastructure, the size, the frontage, etc.

age, etc. "We will also make sure that private developers wanting to develop land are given an equivalent package – there will be a level playing field

A meeting of interested government officers and councillors was held last week to "thrash out" some of the issues surrounding housing and, Cllr Davies said, "...to get a definite lead on some points and end up with an action plan for where we go from here."

Work is also being done on financial assistance for house buyers, he said, explaining, "There may be a certain amount of work we can do in finding slightly lower priced packages but the general feeling at the meeting was that we can't go very far without losing out on quality.

"It may be that we could offer more assistance to people who want to self build but probably the main thing is going to be offering a decent financial packet to first time buyers. At the moment, the bank is fairly conservative and it's difficult to borrow enough money to buy a house without having a substantial lump sum, which some people don't have. So a key part of the strategy is getting that financial package in place to make it easier to borrow enough money to buy a house."

While the news of the release of more plots will be welcome, some people may be concerned that the option of developing West Stanley is being ignored; however, ClIr Davies assured this is not the case.

He commented, "We are going to go ahead and do some more work on West Stanley but that's a year or two ahead. The consensus was that this is the right way forward – to release the government plots that are already available then, over the next one to two years, we'll be looking at a detailed development brief and time table and options for West Stanley."

Q WITH mid-summer well past, is there any likelihood of some serious road capping on the MPA and other roads, where bed rock is showing?

Will the building of MoD roads interfere with the nuch needed maintenance of our own roads?

A Road Engineer Bob Hancox commented, "Capping of the MPA Road is programmed to start on January 22, commencing at the Dairy cattle grid working Westwards along Ponies Pass bypass.

Construction of the military road to Mt Alice will not effect the maintenance as these works are normally carried out by two separate teams.

A tale of two herds



WE, the managers of the Beaver Island Reindeer Herd offer our sympathies and encouragement to our counterparts in the National Reindeer Herd.

It seems true that reindeer are "notoriously fickle." While one herd is decimated, another has a population explosion. Luck of the draw.

However, we feel some personal responsibility. We evidently did not make it sufficiently known to the Department of Agriculture. veterinary officers, or to those directly caring for the reindeer, that there are now around 100 animals on Beaver, from eight males and eight females in 2002, with the addition of fifteen females in 2003.

Had they been aware of this, the managers of the National Reindeer Herd would certainly have contacted us immediately for advice on how to keep Rangifer tarandus fat and healthy all year round. The media were also kept in the dark, so were unable to publish and broadcast information that could have saved the 40-odd animals lost from the National Herd.

We have benefited from the well-advertised experiences of those trying to save the National Herd but have given nothing back. As recompense we feel we must offer, free of charge, our observations on raising reindeer in the Falklands. This advice would, of course, have been available earlier had we made more of an effort to contact interested parties

Our concerns for the wellbeing of the National Herd are not purely humanitarian. With the relatively small numbers in the islands overall, it would be a loss of genetic diversity should either one of the herds fail completely.

Sadly, it may be too late. While some consider the proportions of males to females remaining in the

National herd "well balanced", we would be cautious of the genetic value of offspring from two males and ten females.

When deciding where to place the reindeer on Beaver we realised that by fencing them in we might run the risk of placing them on land Odeficient in something O, namely food.

Reindeer love to wander miles, grazing lightly as they go. This is well-documented behaviour for reindeer in the northern hemisphere and we have seen it for many years among the animals on South Geor-So we gave them the run of gia. the island.

But what of the competition for food between them and other stock? Confirming our pre-introduction observations on South Georgia and contrary to popular belief, reindeer are not keen on tussac unless they are really hungry and we have never observed them cating moss. They like to lie on open greens, but don't graze there much. They gorge on lichen. the pale green hairy stuff that abounds on most rocky hilltops and are doing extremely well.

In fact, if it is not too much to ask, the DOA's expertise in limiting reindeer numbers may soon be needed. Since their introduction. about ten animals have died, mostly of unnatural causes. In the spring of 2006, we estimated that between 20 and 35 fawns were born

All irony aside, why has one herd been drastically reduced, while the other thrives? We don't claim to know all the reasons and neither should any government department that has never acknowledged the existence of, nor asked to see, the only successful reindeer herd in the Falklands.

Page 8 **The world at your feet: eyes down for rare plants**

AT FIRST glance, the Falkland Islands can appear to be a largely uniform landscape of diddle dee and white grass.

However, if you get down on your hands and knees and have a proper look, you'll be surprised at what you can see.

Naturalists and scientists have been collecting and identifying plants in the Falkland Islands for over 200 years and the total number of native species now stands at 171, with a further 175 plants introduced from elsewhere.

Whether some plants are truly native or introduced many years ago, and how some species managed to get across to the Falklands from South America is still being debated by experts across the world.

Comparisons of measurements of growth form, flowering parts and genetic testing of Falkland Islands specimens compared to plants in North and South America, New Zealand, Australia and Europe are key to determining whether a plant in the Falkland Islands is truly native, a subspecies or a plant unique only to the Falkland Islands.

Some plants. like the widespread and easy to spot Vanilla daisy, are endemic meaning that they are only found in the Falkland Islands. Other endemic plants



are much rarer and some along with other native plant species, which are also found in South America, have only been recorded in a few or even only one location here in the islands. In all there are 23 native plants that are so rare as to be of conservation concern and these appear on a national red data list.

Some of these rare plants have undoubtedly been under-recorded. There may be only a narrow window of opportunity to spot the more conspicuous flowers or fruits, they may be at a very low density in an area dominated by another species or it may be that there are just not enough people that can recognise the small and inconspicuous plants.



So are rare plants really rare or are they so small or cryptic that we don't find them? Or do we simply not look in the right places? More eyes to the ground might help to solve these questions.

Now is the time to look for three particularly rare plants. Dusen's moonwort, Adder's tongue and Spider-plant are small plants less than five cm high, which produce flowering parts only during our short summer. These plants are all found at one site at Cape Pembroke and a few other places on East Falklands, but Falklands Conservation think they could be elsewhere.

Whilst they no doubt will remain rare, knowledge of other lo-

cations where they occur could be critical to their conservation.

"We're interested in any records of these plants and now is the time to look for them. At Cape Pembroke, Dusen's moonwort and Spider-plant grow on open, short grass and sand dune environments, and Adder's tongue is found amongst diddle-dee." explains Grant Munro, Director of Falklands Conservation.

"The three plants are so rare that the government has made it illegal to pick or cut them, so please, photos and location information only."

More funding for electro magnetic survey

FALKLANDS Oil and Gas Limited (FOGL) announced in December that the final terms and conditions were agreed with RAB Special Situations (Master) Fund Limited for them to invest £8 million by way of convertible loan notes in the company.

These funds will provide FOGL with additional cash resources to fund its ongoing exploration programme in its licences located to the South and East of the Falklands. In particular it will be used to fund the costs of CSEM (Controlled Source Electro Magnetic Survey) to be conducted by OHM Limited and a sea-bed coring programme.

FOGLs Chief Executive Officer, Tim Bushell, a qualified geologist with 23 years experience in the gas and oil industry, visited the Falklands this week.

Mr Bushell said that at the end of January a new ship will begin a CSEM while further seismic surveys will be undertaken throughout April and May.

"It is time to try to home in on where exactly we want to drill," he said, adding that ideally they would like to narrow it down to 6-8 sites.

The company conducted a 9,450 km 2D seismic survey in the first half of 2005 and identified 130 leads as being potentially capable of trapping hydrocarbons.

However drilling is not likely to begin before the end of 2008 with rig availability remaining an issue throughout the exploration industry.

It is a good time to be a producer of oil. Mr Bushell explained, with prices reaching record highs of \$50 dollars a barrel, however the down side is that most rigs are being used for production wells as the companies try to get as much oil as possible out. This also makes the bigger oil companies less inclined to be interested in exploration at this time.

It costs in the region of £20 million to mobilise a rig to the Falklands and Mr Bushell said that FOGL are keen to the in with other companies working in the region (ie South Africa).

When areas have been identified as potential drill areas through the CSEM survey, FOGL hopes that this will enthuse other companies to join forces with a rig.

"Some big companies are interested but none have actually come along and signed up." said Mr Bushell, adding, that all wanted CSEM surveys undertaken and the results may give them enough confidence to "step over the line" and join FOGL.

Mr Bushel said he always enjoys coming to the Falklands finding the government, "amenable and pragmatic."

"The oil department here is sensible to deal with compared to other parts of the world," concluded the companies CEO.

July TWO companies are short-listed for the coastal shipping contract with the current supplier, Island Shipping Ltd. out of the running. Those shortlisted are Workboat Services Ltd and Western Marine. The unsuccessful tenderers are Island Shipping, Chris May and South American Atlantic Services.

HOT on the heels of last month's Farmers Week, ten farmers meet to discuss the Falklands' first group sheep breeding scheme. Two of the group, Ben Berntsen and Andrez Short, are soon to head to South Africa on a training trip.

In his final days as Governor of the Islands, Howard Pearce shares some frank final thoughts, speaking to Council members at a farewell dinner. Effective co-operation in key areas of the economy - agriculture, tourism and fishing - he said, is important and still has a long way to go in the Falklands. "By working together, you have the opportunity to expand the size of the cake so that everybody's slice be-

The Pearce family waved goodbye to a large crowd of well wishers from the Jetty Visitor's Centre.

A review of Falklands' wool marketing and a strategic plan compiled by David Lambert (commissioned by FIDC) prompts mixed reactions from those involved in the industry.

Travel security is increased in southbound flights only, following the discovery and disruption of a plot to blow up aircraft in flight from the United Kingdom to the United States. Security increases cause travel delays all over the world.

The committee of the General Employees Union is working to modernise the organisation, the chairman Val Berntsen announces, and more than 20 people apply for the post of Director of Tourism from overseas with two local applications

FIDC steps in to run the coastal shipping service following the news that the current supplier, Island Shipping Ltd, has gone into liquidation. The government's Chief Executive assures that any impact on custom-

ers will be kept to a minimum. The man in charge of the insolvent company attributes Island Shipping's demise to cash-flow problems caused by increased operating costs.

Following the Director of Tourism, Connie Stevens' resignation in May, criticism is levelled at the Directors of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board (FITB) by members of the industry. During a lively AGM, FITB members discovered the company accounts were not available to be signed off. Roger Spink of the Falkland Islands Company said he felt members of FITB have received a poor service over the last few months and, "...deserved better than to turn up for an AGM where no accounts had been sent out and there was no business plan outlined to the members of the board."

Around 500 customers have now been moved over to the new Cable and Wireless telephone exchange with the remaining customers to be moved in the next few weeks.

Marie Ferguson and John Coutts tie the knot with a wedding ceremony at their local pub, the Stanley Anns

September

FRESHLY sworn in Governor, Mr Alan Huckle, has the same message for Argentina as his predecessor: there is no room to manoeuvre on sovereignty. Penguin News reports on Mr Huckle's first address to the nation. in which he says, "There is no question of any transfer of sovereignty without the agreement of the Islanders.

A tripartite agreement is signed between the governments of Spain, Britain and Gibraltar and hailed as heralding a new era in a sovereignty dispute which has run since 1704. The agreement, which is announced in Cordoba, Spain, tackles longstanding issues of communications and border restrictions between Spain and Gibraltar, but leaves to one side the thorny question of sovereignty.

Workboat Services Ltd is chosen over Western Marine Ltd as the preferred bidder for the provision of coastal shipping. A new 45 metre bow ramp landing craft, adapted for Falkland Islands waters and to carry up to 36 passengers on the cross sound ferry service, is to be purchased by the company.

No one will be forced to join the proposed new Wool Co-operative, the Rural Business Association assures farmers. Chairman Rikki Evans says the RBA committee has reservations about some parts of the scheme, however they expect to discuss these with the man behind the proposal, David Lambert, when he visits the Islands this month.

A 'lively' meeting is held to discuss the Wool Co-op; some farmers argue that the government should not be funding another scheme to help farmers on the basis that Stanley residents will be opposed to more money going into Agriculture. However Cllr Mike Rendell argues, "For one year of the Lambert proposal we are talking of the equivalent of what government gave three individuals for their (housing) plots, it's not a great deal of money on an annual basis." Four farmers return home after a

rip to South Africa to look at sheep breeding and selection. Andrez Short, Keith Alazia, Ben Berntsen and Steven Dickson visited Dohne studs, group breeders and a wool testing centre as well as the two main South African wool traders.

Just two weeks after leaving, former General Manager of the Development Corporation (FIDC), Julian Morris, returns to the Islands. According to a statement from FIDC, before he left Mr Morris agreed to delay his official departure from the Islands for a few weeks to enable him to complete a number of projects with which he has been dealing personally during the last few months. Mark Brunet (52) is named as Mr Morris's successor and is expected to arrive in the Islands in January 2007.

A mere fifteen members of the public attend a meeting to discuss with councillors the motion to ban smoking in public places. A week later five out of six councillors vote in favour of looking at the implementation of a ban.

Councillors confirm they will not revoke their decision to cut the holiday credits scheme. They were presented with a petition carrying around 800 signatures calling for the scheme to be reinstated to its former level of 50 pence per day per adult and 25 pence per day per child. Councillors say they have a responsibility for a sensible budget that deals with the priorities of public expenditure: "Giving away money for people to go on holiday could reasonably be regarded as not the most important priority."

The latest round of talks on the mandate of the South Atlantic Fisheries Council (SAFC) is "disappointing," according to a statement from Government House, due to the "unconstructive" line taken by the Argentine side.

A new staffing structure for Education is announced, one of the most controversial issues of the year. The proposal, which will bring together under one management structure the separately managed units which exist at present, is put to staff at a meeting held the day before it is reported in *Penguin News*. Director of Education, Barbara Booth, says the proposals do not reduce the number of teaching posts available, but they

do, "...configure the responsibilities in a different way."

A number of GCSE students and their parents are shocked by disappointing results: from a year group of 42 students at the Community School. 38% of students gained five or more A^* - C grades, which is low compared to the UK's standard of 62.4%.

Four Members of Parliament visit the Falklands on the Armed Forces Parliamentary Scheme. The group spend most of their five days in the Islands living and working among the members of the British Forces. All agree they are leaving much more aware of the conditions experienced by the tri-service force in the Falklands.

Four people are injured on the Air Atlanta flight en route from Brize Norton to Ascension Island and the Falklands. The aircraft hit an unexpected pocket of turbulence, resulting in a drop which passenger Gerald Cheek described as "a hell of a bang".

HMS Clyde, the new Falkland Islands Patrol Ship, is officially named in a ceremony held in Portsmouth. HMS Clyde will replace the Castleclass ships which have served the Falklands for the past 24 years. MV Pharos IX is named as the

MV Pharos IX is named as the vessel to take over the duties of Fishery Patrol Vessel Sigma, under a long term charter with the Government of South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands.

BFBS presents the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital with a cheque for £3,500, a percentage of the total raised during the Wireless for the Blind Appeal.

Founding chairman, Terry Peck MBE, is honoured by the Falklands branch of the South Atlantic Medal Association (SAMA82) at a reception at Government House. Terminally ill Terry is presented with a limited-edition print by artist David McEwen, depicting the cross on Mt Longdon, where Terry fought alongside 3Para.

Employees of Cable and Wireless are shocked by news of redundancies within the company. A small number of employees are affected by the redundancies which come with the news that a new company, Cable and Wireless (South Atlantic) Ltd is to be established.

A workshop is held by councillors to consider long term measures to help the Camp Economy. Cllr Ian Hansen says the government remains committed to following the Agricultural Business Plan. ", and so the challenge now is to encourage wider participation and more rapic progress."

The Head of the FCO's Overseas Territories Department, Mi Leigh Turner, visits the Falklands and says the recent agreement signed between Gibraltar, Spain and the UK is a good model for the Falklands to follow.

A group of Robbie Williams fans travel from the Falklands to Santiago to watch their idol in concert and TV presenter Nigel Marven holidays in the Islands before heading to South Georgia to film a wildlife documentary.

The Public Works Department looks at green options for reducing the amount of refuse that ends up on Eliza Cove tip and the Environmental Planning Department has praise for two local businesses who run schemes to cut down on the use of plastic bags.

Autocar teams up with Land Rover in the Islands for a photo shoot. The shoot is to be the finale to a major supplement given away with the Autocar magazine which tells the story of the new Land Rover Freelander from conception to production. Locations for the shoot include Paloma Beach, Darwin, Goose Green and Bodie Creek Bridge.

November

NOVEMBER is a dramatic month in the Courts. Almost a year after being suspended from duty, the Chief of Police. Mr David Morris, is found guilty of perverting the course of justice; he also faced a joint charge, with DS Jonathan Butler, of perverting the course of justice, however, in light of the conviction and the fact that Mr Morris became ill on the evening of his verdict, this charge is discontinued. Mr Butler is then charged with misconduct in public office to which he immediately pleads guilty. He receives two hundred hours community service and is ordered to pay £500 costs. Mr Morris has yet to be sentenced.

After almost twenty years' service as Attorney General, David Lang QC officially retires this month his successor is former Principal Crown Counsel, Melanie Chilton whose post will be filled by Falkland Islander Ros Cheek.

Small Uruguayan trawler Holberg runs aground in Port Purvis, West Falkland, while operating on an exploratory licence for scallops. At a public meeting held the following week, councillors are grilled about the government's reaction to the grounding and the apparent lack of action taken to prevent environmental damage. Cllr Davies tels the meeting the Holberg had a "relatively small" quantity of fuel leakage and it had been deemed not worth taking oil spill response kit to the area.

Islander Bravo India, an aircraft from the government air service (FIGAS) fleet, sustains extensive damaged whilst landing at West Point

Island. None of the three people on board is injured. The loss of the airframe could mean some disruption to the FIGAS service, a spokesperson says, but this will be kept to a minimum.

Councillors welcome news of a proposal to enable students from Overseas Territories to be treated as home students for fee rates at institutions in England. Councillor Richard Stevens says the move could result in "serious" savings to the government.

Things are not all rosy in the Education Department, however, and Cllr Stevens and his colleague, Janet Robertson, meet with teachers to discuss plans for restructuring the department. Cllr Robertson says most of the disquiet has been caused by an apparent lack of consultation with teachers before the restructuring was announced.

Penguin News carries out a vox pop to see how the public feel councillors have performed in their first year since election; the results show most people are not terribly impressed with their performance so far and 60% of those polled feel there is no more transparency than a year ago.

Visiting Member of Parliament, Mike Penning, says the Falklands should "sing from the rafters" about Argentine pressure. He recommends following the example of Gibraltar whose campaign ended in the agreement with Spain.

Civil Liaison Officer John Maskell-Bott is to have his recipe for hot-smoked mullet included in the new book. *Natural Ingredients, Taste of the Falklands,* after he wins a cooking competition. Sponsored by Seafish Chandlery, the contest is launched by Alex Olmedo of Falklands Brasserie and Julie Bellhouse of Studio 52 who ask entrants to create a meal making the best use of local ingredients.

In the hope of becoming an affiliate member of the International Cricket Council. Stanley's cricketers spend a week working with the Americas Regional Development officer, Grant Dugmore. Becoming an affiliate member of the ICC will mean cricket in the Falklands will become more organised, more formally structured and will help everybody to improve their game and become more keen. Mr Dugmore says.

There are community events galore this month with a Hallowe en disco organised by the Infant and Junior School's Parents' Association, a ceildh held to raise funds for three local charities and an afternoon tea supporting the Cancer Support and Awareness Trust. A banquet held in aid of SAMA82 raises an incredible £5.000 and the Royal British Legion's annual dinner dance is a roaring success.

A group of 1982 veterans and family members spend a week in the Islands and participate in the Remembrance Sunday service and three Royal Marines who served with Yankee Company, 45 Commando in 1982 retrace their epic yomp from Port San Carlos. Plans for the commemorations for the 25th Anniversary of the Falklands War are officially announced in London at an event held aboard HMS *Illustrious*.

There's a new man in charge of the British Forces in the South Atlantic. Brigadier Nick Davies MBE MC takes the helm from Commodore Ian Moncrieff.

Roanna Lloyd and Paul 'Streaky' Joshua tie the knot in Christ Church Cathedral.

In sport, a coaching team from Carlisle United put local and military footballers through their paces, Stanley beats teams from Mount Pleasant in a round-robin netball tournament, MPA beats Stanley in the first game of the season in the competition for the Falkland Islands Cricket Cup, and the Rifle Club season gets underway.

December

FOLLOWING a number of queries raised by the editor of *Penguin News*, the Attorney General, Melanie Chilton, provides an in depth account of the decision to bring criminal prosecutions against the two senior police officers last month. She says the nature of the offences were such that they could not be ignored or handled. "...in anything other than the most serious way."

Just two weeks later, and after less than two months in the job. Mrs Chilton tenders her resignation. Chief Executive. Chris Simpkins, says the resignation is, "...for family health reasons." The news sparks a number of rumours within the community: while not wishing to comment on any specific rumour. Cllr Richard Davies tells *Penguin News* he has ascertained that no evidence has been presented to the government that warranted investigation.

In court, Andrew MacDonald is sentenced to three months in jail for his spree of vandalism over a year ago.

Lord Triesman, the Foreign and Commonwealth Office Minister responsible for relations with the UK OTs, has to postpone his two day visit due to a delay on the airbridge. At a meeting of Legislative Council, Cllr Davies says this incident highlights the need to ensure the airbridge is a reliable link with the UK.

A team of experts visits the Falklands to assess the technical and environmental issues surrounding landmine clearance and say they believe the Islands can be totally cleared. While admitting some of the areas are "frightful." the group say the humanitarian methods and rules that would be followed mean fields can be completely cleared.

Daughter of former British Prime Minister. Carol Thatcher. visits the Islands for the second time in a month to film a television programme, the working title of which is Mummy's War. Carol tells Penguan News the programme will focus not only on the Conflict but also on the modern Falkland Islands.

Two officers with the Royal Falkland Islands Police embark on a mammoth feat to walk the equivalent of ten marathons in as many days, raising money for SAMA82 and the Stephen Jaffray Memorial Fund. They beat their goal, completing the task in just eight days and are greeted at the police station in Stanley by children from the Infant and Junior School.

The fundraising continues as the Stanley Arms presents a cheque for $\pounds1,348.85$ to SAMA82, money raised during the month of Novem-

ber alone, and the Fire Brigade's annual engine pull raises around £720 for the Stephen Jaffray Memorial Fund.

The Royal Marines Association celebrates 30 years since the Royal Marines received the Freedom of Stanley with a dinner dance in the Town Hall and, as Christmas approaches, the Girl Guides take to the streets to serenade shoppers with carols.

Dustin Gilson-Clarke and Toni Clifford enjoy an FIDF wedding, Phil Hartley and Jeanette Hawksworth take their vows in the open air while in London Falkland Islands Government representative Sukey Cameron becomes engaged to Howard Pullen.

Twenty-two years ago

January 21 1985 LEGISLATIVE Councillors spend many hours considering the proposals of the draft new constitution for the Falklands, but the deliberations come to a head when councillors announce their general agreement with both the documents for the Falklands and the Dependencies. However, the agreement is not unqualified. A number of clauses do not meet with the satisfaction of the Councillors and a list of points are presented to the Civil Commissioner.

Substantial satisfaction is expressed at the new reference to self determination, but they are concerned that the guarantee is to appear as a preamble to the document rather than a clause in the first section. 'Protection of Fundamental Rights and Freedoms of the Individual'. The committee agree that persons guilty of treason should be liable to capital punishment and that the term "Civil Commissioner" should be replaced by "Governor". Civil servants should not be allowed to stand for election to the Legislative Council, however under the new constitution, LegCo will be able to permit categories of government employees to participate in elections.

Parliamentarians are swift to voice their anger in London when it is announced that Islanders are to have the right to self determination guaranteed in the new constitution. Dr David Owen of the Social Democrats accuses Mrs Thatcher of giving Islanders the power of veto in any proposed solution for the dispute. According to the BBC Mrs Thatcher replies to the MP's criticisms denying that Islanders would have the right of veto. MP's have been further exasperated by the Government's apparent intention to pass the constitutions for the Falklands and the Dependencies as orders in Council. Approval of Parliament would not be necessary.

In Legislative Council motion for adjournment speeches Cllr Bill Goss voices his concerns about the state of the economy and the outlook for the future. Cllr Tim Blake says that although various bodies including the UN have been told that the new airport is to be primarily a civilian facility. Lord Trefgarne said the opposite during a recent visit. "There has to be a specific commitment for us to use the airport," he said, adding, "not just on an ad hoc basis.

Twelve years ago January 21, 1995

SIR Andrew Bowden, MBE, MP welcomes fellow delegates from the British Islands and Mediterranean Region to the first session of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association Seminar, the first such gathering ever to be held in the Falkland Islands. Representatives from Malta, the U.K. the Isle of Man, Guernsey, Gibraltar, Jersey. St Helena and the Commonwealth Secretariat arrived on Tuesday, January 17.

Telling the Argentine people about life in the Falklands since the war is the goal of a tour planned by Graham Bound and Janet Robertson. The proposed lecture-slide-show tour will represent the first attempt by Islanders to present the Falklands picture to a broad spectrum of Argentinians. Graham stressed that the tour would not be financed by government funds.

FIG has been taking steps to recruit a firm of Public Relations specialist to represent Falkland Islands interests.

Members of the Stanley Senior School graduating class of '72, together with their teacher Peter Gilding have a brilliant get together in Malvina House. The Cathedral is to house Lord Shackleton's Garter Banner. The banner previously hung over Lord Shackleton's stall in the Chapel of the Order of the Garter, St. George's Chapel, Windsor. It will be brought into the Stanley Cathedral by a detachment from HMS *Endurance*.

A Sea King helicopter from RAF Mount Pleasant lands without incident on the MPA road near Mt William when a fan-belt breaks and a burning smell is detected in the cockpit. A Chinook is tasked to fly a replacement fan-belt and two engineers to the scene.

Cool Falklands summer but hayfever is rife

HAND in hand with the New Year came suffering for a number of unfortunate people afflicted with hayfever.

As with every year, the hospital pharmacy is experiencing a greater demands for hayfever medication and pharmacist Caroline Richards says, "we are using them up at a rate of knots". She says that sufferers should not worry though as they haven't run out of medication, apart from Piriton (Chlorphenamine) syrup for children, for which they have alternatives available.

Caroline says you can almost set your watch to the date when the pharmacy starts to get a steady stream of watery eyed, snuffly nosed people at clinics and pharmacy. "It always seem to kick off around the Christmas Sports and lasts most of January, after that it seems to tail back off. There must be a particular grass or flower that comes out this time of year that seems to set people off.

Sufferers who haven't already got medication on prescription can go along to pharmacy and buy antihistamine tablets, eye drops and nasal sprays if they feel they need them. Caroline said. She commented. "It is important to note that eye drops and nasal sprays need to be used regularly throughout the 'season' in order for them to work effectively and keep symptoms at bay; using them only when eyes run or noses stream will not afford good relief."

The cause of hayfever is a response to an allergy that enters the body through the eyes, mouth or nose, she explained. "Just because it is called hayfever it doesn't mean it is only hay or grass that cause the problem, although those are common causes. In some people it is dust, pollen, animals etc.

Treatment as with all conditions starts with avoiding a situation that you know will cause your symptoms to worsen. Often this is impractical and then medication is required."

Some people need antihistamine tablets, she said while some need just eye drops or nasal sprays. "Some need all of these. Some people have hayfever from spring until the end of summer, others only when a particular plant, grass or other allergen is around.

'All of the medications available are safe to use over a long period and they continue to work. i.e. people do not get used to them.'

Royal visit first day cover

Day FIRST Cover commemorate the visit by HRH The Princess Royal to the Falklands and Antarctica was date cancelled by the Philatelic Bureau staff late on Friday afternoon, after word had been received that the Royal party had arrived at Mount Pleasant.

The cover features an albatross design by Sonia Felton, opposite the albatross 20p stamp for internal mail. The slow process of hand feeding the printer with five envelopes at a time undertaken by the Clifford family finished late on Thursday night, with stamps applied throughout Friday morning. The cover was given royal approval by Her Royal Highness when she visited the Scouts display stand in the Parish Hall on Sunday morning. A pound donation from all covers sold will go towards sending a contingent of scouts to the Centenary World Jamboree later this year.

Fifty covers have been sent south to accompany the visit to Antarctica, and it is hoped that base cachets can be added to the covers.

Wool report - week ending January 12 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices exploded upwards at sales in Australia and South Africa last week, however very broad wool lots struggled to maintain previous sale price levels in New Zealand.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, some individual "finer" micron categories increased in price by as much as 40 p/kg clean during the week while broader lots increased in value by between 6 and 16 p/kg clean.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up approximately 35 pence per kilogram at 370.4 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 335.6 pence per kilogram clean.

Buyers concerned about wool supply over the next few months created quite extreme buying conditions at auctions in Sydney, Melbourne, Fremantle and Port Elizabeth.

Wool supply has been greatly affected by on-going drought conditions in much of the Australian sheep and wool belt. In addition, the continued trend to mate metino ewes to crossbred rams to produce prime lambs has also greatly reduced the overall supply of merino wool to the market.

In Australia 96% of the 47,145 bales presented to the trade changed hands. In South Africa 99% of the 8,455 bales available were sold. Considerable interest exists over whether price levels can be maintained next week in the face of a considerably larger international wool offering.

North Arm Sports week shortened but not reduced


NORTH ARM is planning a slightly shorter sports week than normal, however it will be crammed full with all the usual activities and a few more besides.


Tony McMullen made an overdue return to the prizes with 38 points to take third place. Best Lady went to Carole Lee with 28 points.

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Sir Rex in June VIP party

FORMER Governor Sir Rex Hunt is among the group of special guests who will be travelling to the Falklands to join in the 25th Anniversary commemorations in June

The 2007 Committee this week announced that Sir Rex and Lady Hunt will visit from June 12 - 18. along with Lord Parkinson, a member of Baroness Thatcher's Cabinet in 1982, who will represent the former Prime Minister.

Also in the group will be Major Chris Keeble, Commander "Sharkey" Ward, Major Mike Nor-man RM: Mrs Sara Constance, whose late husband was involved in the liberation of Goose Green, and the sister of Lieutenant Richard Nunn RM, who is buried at San Carlos. Representatives of the Falkland Islands Association will be among the guests, notably Mrs Merle Christie and Drs Robert and Heather Elgood. Harold Briley will be back, as will Father Augustine Monaghan.

The Falklands branch of the South Atlantic Medal Association (SAMA82) will be hosting six couples who will join in the June events. Two families from the Falkland

Families Association have also been invited, as have close relatives of the late Lt Nick Taylor, who will visit for the anniversary of his death in early May.

Representatives of a number of countries and territories who gave generously and came to the assist-ance of the Falklands in 1982 have received invitations. Gibraltar has confirmed it will attend.

Veterans Minister Derek Twigg this week announced that, contrary to a report in the Observer, a member of the Royal Family and the Armed Forces Minister, Adam Ingram, will be joining in the commemorations. Mr Twigg added that he would be visiting the Islands as part of the SAMA82 pilgrimage being planned for November.

The June programme The usual programme in Stanley for Liberation Day will be followed on June 14, with a church service and parade, during which British Forces will exercise their Freedom of the Falkland Islands and

march through parts of town. On June 15 the anniversary of the Argentine surrender at Fox Bay will be marked and there will also be community events in Stanley

Plans are also being made to have a memorial to the Atlantic Conveyor constructed at Cape Pembroke and an unveiling will take place during the week of commemorations.

The memorial will feature a bronze ship's propeller recovered from Navy Point. Planning permission pending, the Public Works department proposes to erect it at Cape Pembroke in an inclined pocape remotoke in an include po-sition. The gap between the two top flukes will point to the last rest-ing point of the *Atlantic Conveyor*.

The engraving and renovation works to the monument are being undertaken by Rob Yssel and the ground works and support will be provided by the property and municipal section.

A service at Blue Beach is planned for the morning of June 17 and this will be included in the BBC's live commemorative coverage. While the service takes place, the 2007 Committee is hoping that as many people as possible will gather at the Tristar Hangar at Mount Pleasant for a "families day' of displays and activities. IT'S throw-away comments like, "laws should be put in place to cure a problem, not just because other countries have them," that stick in my mind and secure a vote when it comes to elections, not the sometimes grand promises made in manifestos.

At Tuesday's public meeting focusing on amendments to the Road Traffic Bill, Mike Summers made this point when it was suggested that MOTs should be compulsory for all vehicles, his point being that while it is very important for PSVs to have checks - which they do - the police have the power to remove unsafe vehicles from the road so there is already less complicated legislation in place to deal with the problem. So simple and it really makes sense, doesn't it?

It was an interesting, lively and productive debate however I was just a little gobsmacked to hear two councillors declare that, traffic wise, they do not consider our sleepy little town safe enough for their children to walk to school.

I am not against a few more zebra crossings being introduced around town if it gives parents peace of mind; having studied the Highway Code and being blessed with a smidgen of common sense, I don't suffer from this confusion that is said to reign among drivers when approaching one. At the end of the day, they are only lines on the road, the same level of consideration and awareness should be given to pedestrians, especially children at all times when behind the wheel. Somehow I even manage to avoid the older children, that hurtle towards me on push-bikes down the one way section of Drury Street too - and yes, I was heading the right way myself. Were I to be a little cynical, I would suggest that if all children were to

Were I to be a little cynical, I would suggest that if all children were to walk to school the level of traffic would more than likely be so reduced in the mornings and at lunchtimes that they would all be as safe as houses anyway.

Stanley has grown, but not to such an extent that a child cannot walk to school from anywhere in town, once they've been shown the route and the parent is satisfied that they know how to cross the road safely. Yes, there is more traffic now than when I was a child but, the maximum speed limit has not increased since 1982/3 when it was put up from 20 to 25 mph. The volume of traffic also saw a rapid increase at that time. I don't however, recall children being ferried everywhere by car back then because the roads were not safe, nor do I recall anyone, child or adult being run over.

I do understand the concerns. Living on Jersey Road near Kids Zone, I have on the odd occasion been horrified to witness vehicles, often throbbing with music, zipping down the street and have wondered whether some sleeping policemen (humps) would help. But why should everyone be inconvenienced for a small number of inconsiderate drivers?

If there are drivers putting pedestrians at risk then it is the policing of traffic that needs to be addressed and a few zebra crossings are not going to fix it. I stand by my comment made at Tuesdays' meeting that a wide awake policeman on the corner is a darn sight more effective than a sleeping one on the road.

In most other countries children can't walk to school because of dangers far greater than crossing Philomel Street. Lets keep things in perspective and legislate realistically.

Combined factors led to poor show for Royals

PENGUIN News readers have blamed the tone of an advertisement and "over policing" for the poor turn out in Stanley at events held in honour of The Princess Royal earlier this month.

Around a dozen readers responded to an appeal from the Editor for their impressions as to why so few people turned out to see the Princess.

The timing of the reception, which was held at 4pm on a Saturday afternoon, seemed to put a number of people off but, it was the tone of an advertisement for the reception released by Gilbert House which raised the most hackles.

One reader summed this up: "The tone of the advertisement didn't endear people and make them keen to attend; for example, if anyone was meeting her elsewhere then they were discouraged from attending.

"There seemed much more hype for Prince Charles' visit. I think it helped when the community were encouraged to be involved in his arrival, is school children lining streets and waving flags..."

Another commented, "Being instructed on how to behave around and address Princess Anne - right down to the the pronounciation of Ma'am - put me right off. It was as though Falkland Islanders couldn't be trusted to act appropriately. How patronising."

The requirement to request tickets annoyed another reader: "I know a lot of guys who would have gone to the reception if they could have just turned up and not had to get tickets."

Two respondents were offended by what they described as "over policing". One commented, "You couldn't drive/park along Ross Road when Princess Anne wanted to walk.

"The way the police were acting, you would think we were all a bunch of criminals, it was just over the top."

Speaking to *Penguin News* early this week, His Excellency said he welcomed feedback from Islanders on Princess Anne's visit, with a view to improving arrangements for the second Royal visit later this year.

Public have a say on Road Bill

A BAN on the use of mobile phones when driving is to be included in the Road Traffic Bill when it goes to Executive Council.

At a public meeting held on Tuesday to discuss the Bill, Councillor Janet Robertson said it had been her suggestion that the use of mobile phones, two-metre sets or any handheld instrument should be prohibited. However, after much discussion with experienced drivers councillors considered sufficient that mobile phones should be specified, as they create a "high level of distraction" with good evidence that accidents have occurred through their use while driving.

There were many other activities mooted at the meeting as being equally distracting, all of which are covered by the offence of driving without due care and attention. One member of the public said that mobiles need to be specified so that people are well aware that they should not use them when driving.

Good samaritan protection

Concern was expressed that there is no protection for 'good samaritans' offering a fellow motorist a tow.

A member of the public cited a case where a vehicle under tow by a 'good samaritan' had crashed into another vehicle when the brakes failed and the 'good samaritan' driver had been prosecuted and consequently paid a heavy fine.

The person felt now was the chance for legislation to be put in place to prevent any similar incidents.

Councillor Summers said that the real criticism should be levelled at the Courts who "did not exercise common sense" at the time. The issue is to be further discussed with the Attorney General.

Seatbelts

The final version of the Road Traffic Bill concerning seatbelts will almost mirror the UK law and will have provision for exemptions which will be separate to the Bill, said Councillor Robertson.

Speed limits

Following up his suggestions at an earlier consultation Robin Smith asked if there had been any more thought given to raising the speed limit on the Stanley to Mount Pleasant Road from 40 mph to 50mph, to 30 mph in some parts of town and introducing a one way system in the old part of town.

Councillors were inclined to support the increase to 50mph on the MPA road. Councillor Summers said it was interesting to note that the 25mph town speed limit has been in place since just after 1982 and since then the roads and standards of vehicles have improved.

Councillor Richard Davies thought there was a good case for increasing the limit on the MPA road but would not support an increase in the town.

Councillor Janet Robertson said she was not in favour of a one way system using some east to west roads - ie John Street, Fitzroy Road. However, other councillors and several members of the public thought it was worthy of discussion given that with Ross Road now a 'clearway.' a controversial issue when it was introduced but well accepted now, it was more likely to be successful.

A proposal outlining the suggestions will be made to Executive Council, said Clir Robertson.

Pedestrian crossings

More pedestrian crossings in the centre of town to make it safer for children walking to school would find favour with ClIr Robertson. Philomel Street was highlighted as one area in need of a safe crossing, however it was felt that the proposed position at the bottom of the hill would need to be looked at further as it would doubtless cause traffic disruptions during the tourist season.

A variety of traffic systems were discussed however Cllr Robertson said she felt that pedestrian crossings were the less onerous option.

A New Year's resolution - drive or use the Blue Bus Veteran ship under threat

AS SALVORS struggled to container ship in Lyme Bay, Devon this week, another maritime battle was going on in Plymouth: to save the Falklands veteran frigate HMS Plymouth, preserved since the war as a memorial to all the UK seafarers lost in the South Atlantic in 1982.

Fundraising over the last eleven months has now seen enough money pledged to purchase the ship which is laid up on Merseyside. This in-cludes £20k raised by her former crew members.

The plan is to put her on public display at Millbay docks (Plymouth) before Easter, for the start of the 25th anniversary of the war.

All she needs to go on public display is an electrical power supply and an external "wash and brush up

However a new manager at Millbay docks since Christmas has reversed the offer of a berth by his predecessor and without a berth all the fundraising of the last eleven months seems to be wasted.

Mike Critchley from the company hoping to purchase her later this month said, "The whole team who have put hundreds of hours voluntarily into purchasing and relocating HMS Plymouth to the city are frankly stunned."

A "full and frank" discussion was held on Tuesday morning with the new manager at Associated British Ports Plymouth.

Mr Critchley said the man now has, "plenty to think about," on the subject of HMS Plymouth and intends to talk to various people and give his decision in a week's time.

"If they confirm their position. we either hunt for a new berth in Plymouth or give up and try and forget all the time expended on this project," said Mr Critchley.

Bishop Stephen will be known as the Bishop for the Falkland Islands. He will in effect become the Anglican Bishop for the Falklands, under the authority of the Archbishop

Bishop Stephen is no stranger to the Islands, having taken an interest in the Falklands since 2001, when he was invited to sponsor Kathy Biles for training for ordination. His first visit was in January 2006 on the occasion of Kathy's ordination.

He will return in June 2007 to visit the parish and to take part in the 25th Anniversary Liberation Day service in Christ Church Cathedral.

is as the bishop with responsibility for the Diocese of Canterbury, where he provides day to day lead-ership on behalf of the Archbishop. ...so his appointment will enhance the existing links between the Anglican Church in the Falkland 1slands and the Diocese of Canterbury and provide a welcome continuity of pastoral care for the Cathedral and the Islands."

Lookout road behind schedule but not over budget

BACK in October, the Board of the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) learned that work on the Lookout Industrial Estate spine road had begun and was on schedule to be completed within eleven weeks.

However, twenty-one weeks have now passed and the road is not completed. Chief Executive Chris Simpkins said the contractor Morrison (Falklands) Ltd had not anticipated finding soft spots or damaged pipe work when digging; both of these occurred, putting the project slightly behind schedule.

"The first layer of tarmac was laid in mid-December and the road was opened to traffic immediately afterwards (week 14). Since then, the road has been fully operational.

The road is an FIDC project be-ing managed by the Public Works department acting as FIDC's agents.

It is expected that the top layer of tarmac will be laid on the road at the end of January, Mr Simpkins said, thus completing the project.

He added that the work is expected to be completed within the original budget of £200,000.



FURTHER to my letter in *Penguin* News dated August 11, 2006. describing the events of July 28, 2006, when while reversing from the FIDF hall. I was stopped by police officers and informed that I was under arrest on suspicion of causing serious injury by reckless driving.

I was taken to the police station and after some hours of interrogation, 40 pages in all, I was released on bail. Eventually I appeared in court on January 11, 2007, charged with driving without due care and attention: to which I pleaded, as I was, "not guilty."

Crown Counsel took about three hours to present the statements before him, one of which was the 40 page statement on the night I was arrested. There were no witnesses.

The other evidence was from people such as the doctor at the hospital, the first person arriving at the scene, two passengers who had been in the taxi earlier, the per-

son calling the emergency services and the police who were working at the scene.

The Senior Magistrate, in finding me guilty, stated that she was satisfied that it had been unintentional, that it was one of those things that happens.

The Penguin News report came out the next day; a great number of people have either stopped me in the street, approached me in the shops or telephoned me, expressing their disbelief at the outcome of the trial

They have asked such questions as how could a human back withstand a heavy car, the rear quarter weighing between a quarter and half a ton, not just once but twice?

The ground clearance to the running board is about 71/2 inches.

To all those people who contacted me. I take this opportunity of sincerely thanking them for their support.

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Experts prepare for pilgrimage

THE man in charge of an organisation dedicated to helping war veterans suffering from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) is not expecting any problems during the pilgrimage planned for later this year. Nevertheless, Toby Elliot, Chief

Nevertheless. Toby Elliot. Chief Executive of the society Combat Stress says a team of clinicians will accompany the veterans on their Falklands visit.

As part of this year's pilgrimage, Combat Stress plans to bring a number of men to whom they are providing support and care. These men. Mr Elliot says, are suffering the long term psychological effects of war which can be experienced by servicemen and women through repeated exposure to traumatic events which are an occupational hazard of military service.

Islanders have seen first-hand it is a trip worth making. Mr Elliot agrees: "It is well known that a return to the battlefield can do an enormous amount of help in the business of laying to rest the unsettling and intrusive memories which can prove so unpleasant."

A small party of veterans helped by Combat Stress were amongst the group which came down for the 20th Anniversary Pilgrimage, supported by some specialist clinicians from the society. They had been selected to ensure that no harm was done so anyone assessed to be a risk was not selected to travel.

was not selected to travel. Exactly the same process will apply this year. "We will send a small team of clinicians, we will have conducted this screening process, and we will have prepared those who will go so that they are able to gain full benefit from the Pilgrimage. We will ensure that they are well on their return."

The group who came down last time all reported that they were able to lay to rest many of those intrusive memories, and the improvement in their condition was marked. Mr Elliot said. "They experienced no adverse effects. They particularly appreciated and gained from the wonderful hospitality and expression of gratitude of their hosts."

He adds, "Interestingly enough, many of the other veterans who went down in the party sought out our clinicians during the trip, and were given advice and help.

"Some are now also registered with the society and, as some will know, there are Islanders who also carry psychological scars as a result of what happened to them during the war, and we have had the pleasure of helping some of them over here in the UK in our treatment centres. "We are not surprised and an-

"We are not surprised and anticipate the same thing will happen again this year - a good thing."

pen again this year - a good thing." On that basis, Mr Elliot says, Combat Stress does not expect that there will be a problem with their veterans this year. "...but if this turns out to be the case our clinicians will be there should they be needed."

He adds, "I think, if anything, it is most likely to be an outpouring of bottled up grief, and there will be tears. That is part of the healing process, as your readers will understand, and if it occurs I am sure that it will be through showing understanding and concern that the best way of helping will occur."

best way of helping will occur." Mr Elhot will be coming down with the small Combat Stress support team. Should anyone wish to get in contact with him in the meantime, he said he would be "very pleased" to hear from them.



By Sharon Jaffray THE old style Camp settlements traditionally had a 'big house' as the nucleus complete with a gardener to provide the household with an bundance of fresh produce.

Stanley's 'big house' is somewhat grander in the form of the Governor's residence: tucked away to the rear of the building are vegetable gardens and greenhouses that keep the Huckle family and their many guests supplied with every vegetable imaginable, all year round

Quietly putting their green fingers to work in the background, creating a visual as well as a gournet delight are head gardener Derek Short and fellow gardeners, Roy Ross and Sonia Felton.

Derek has worked at the gardens for 10 years and has been head gardener for two. He left his former trade of wool classer for a life in the open

Each has an area of interest and expertise with Derek being the veg man: Sonia is passionate about her flowers and exotic houseplants while Roy fights a continuous but victorious


battle with the grass cutting and weeds. Visiting the gardens after almost a week of destructive winds and freezing

cold temperatures at a time of year that we would normally expect to be basking in the sun, I thought I had probably not chosen a good time to de-scend on them. The gardens are, however, magnificent and a real credit to those who have, since 1845, shaped, created and cared for them,

Taking a tour around the vegetable plots with Derek. I asked how this season with low temperatures and some rather fierce stormy interludes has affected the crops.

Most things are fairly average Derck said although some plants such as asparagus have gone to seed early, more than likely due to the low temperatures experienced in the early part of the summer; it is however, looking like a good year for the parsnips and carrots which prefer wet conditions.

The Government House kitchen receives a steady supply of potatoes, carrots, cauliflower, cabbage, tomatoes, cucumbers, courgettes, pumpkin and turnips to mention but a few. These

ers are in awe of not confines and the calm way she turns out food for parcalm way she tunne out 1000 for par-ties without getting stressed. The inties without getting stressed. The in-season produce that cannot be used up

season produce that cannot be used up is frozen or made into preserves. Meeting up with Sonia Felton, we tour the polytunnels where she grows flowers to be cut for the house. Here I discover that Sonia likes the earwigs

discover that Sonia fixes the earwigs that most people consider a pest. "Do they get rid of the bad bugs?" I ask, thinking she used them as a form of pest control, "oh no they're just of pest control, on no they re just such good parents and they mate for life..." Well, even so they still make me squirm and I peer cautiously into the dahla blooms before taking a sniff.

Of course you can't be surrounded by all this greenery and not do some tasting. Like a giant caterpillar I nibble parsley, nasturtium flowers and leaves, (checking for earwigs first), just like cress, it makes a great sandwich," Sonia assures.

Calafate berries, like a blueberry and good in gin, juicy fuschia seed pods (like a mini kiwi fruit) cherry toma-

were some splendid looking strawberries too, but Derek has constructed a rather ingenious net system to keep the birds out - it works! Nestled under the hill and sur-

rounded by fences and trees the gardens are given as much shelter as possible but they have not escaped the elements completely. I spot several cabbages with their heads twisted off in the wind and some of the fruit bushes are hanging on for dear life. But these gardens have been here for more than 160 years now so a few summer storms are not going to cause a setback.

There is something of a story book quality about the gardens with their surrounding trees and hedges and numerous nooks and crannies harbouring endless horticultural surprises.

Looking to the west the verandah/ porch of Gardeners' Cottage built in 1845-6 and basically unchanged is just visible, keeping a watchful eye on the garden as it grows over the years.

Local Toothfish

In memory of former Agricultural head and FIC manager

JOHN Parker Oliver (known as JPO) was born in Derbyshire on May 18, 1918 and educated at Ilkeston Grammar School and Loughbourgh Agricultural College.

Loughbourgh Agricultural College. During the Second World War he worked for the Ministry of Agriculture, employing prisoners of war to produce food to feed the nation, and served in the local home guard.

He married Phyllis Annie Hicklin in 1942 and their oldest daughter Win was born in 1943. After the war he looked for opportunities overseas and was appointed to the post of Agricultural Officer in the Falklands in 1948. Daughter Phyl was born in Stanley in 1949.

During six years as FIG's head of Agriculture he also ran the Customs and Immigration Department and FIGAS for a time, with Madge Biggs ably running the office, and served as an *ex officio* member on Executive Council during Sir Myles Clifford's governorship.

He travelled all over the Islands during those years. The Agricultural Department had a good troop of horses that were kept on and around the racecourse and he rode to all the farms in the north camp on a regular basis. often accompanied by Chuck Clifton as guide in the early years.

He really enjoyed his visits to the West and the outer islands, spending weeks away travelling on small cutters to visit his favourite farms such as Carcass and West Point Island, down to Weddell and Beaver Island and riding all over the West. As well as giving advice on stock management he was required to act as vet as no veterinary officer was employed at the time. Several trips



to Punta Arenas impressed him where he visited Fenton Station, an estancia he greatly admired.

JPO had a great sense of humour and loved to tell a story often at the expense of himself. While managing FIGAS there were many incidents when he flew with the pilot out to Camp to drop the mail from the plane to save a landing, dropping it in many inconvenient places such as gorse bushes and cow shed roofs.

Officers were required to sign the visitors' book at Government House on arrival and departure from Stanley and he would sign after his name "GTC" or "RFC" depending on whether he was about to go out to Camp or had just returned. This set people wondering what degree he had. By 1954 John had convinced

By 1954 John had convinced Phyllis that they should settle in the Falklands and he took up an appointment with the FIC as manager at Goose Green. He enjoyed the challenges of running the largest sheep farm in the Islands with its numerous employees. Long gathers on horseback and nights staying in outside houses were a pleasure to him.

Wool prices were high and money was invested in electric generators to power the settlement and new outside houses were constructed and also kitted out with generators.

He revelled in winter trips with the Jaffrays and Fords in the Gambler or Black Swan to get beef from tussac islands. One trip resulted in being away without communications for a week or more, due to bad weather, when they sheltered around Motley and Triste islands, with wives waiting anxiously for news.

He took a great interest in the building of Darwin Boarding School with the Goose Green gang contributing to its construction and opening in June 1956.

He moved to North Arm in 1964 to run the farm. Christmases were spent at Bull Point with fellow managers and he found another favourite part of the Islands to visit regularly: Bleaker Island. A horse ride down to Driftwood Point and a dinghy ride across the Jump would result in a visit with Rhoda and Arthur McBain to view the stock.

He regularly attended the annual Farmers' Week meetings and preferred to ride to Stanley and back to prevent being delayed in town with bad weather when there were often lengthy delays for those relying on a flight home. He had a favourite horse called *Hazel* that took him on many a long gather and into town.

John retired from the FIC in 1973 and he and Phyllis went back to Derbyshire to run a small family farm for a number of years. Many people from Lafonia called in to stay when visiting the UK and were entertained with his story telling.

He continued to keep a substantial vegetable garden even after he moved to a smaller house near his old school and enjoyed making wine from his grape vine, writing, reading books in French and Spanish to keep his brain sharp and doing complicated mathematical calculations!

JPO died after a brief illness on December 11, 2006. He is survived by wife, Phyllis, daughters Win and Phyl and grandchildren Adeline, Victoria and Nick. By the family of the late John Oliver.

| Twenty-five years ago - January 18, 1982 | |

A LONG running wages dispute culminates in a strike by Stanley members of the General Employees Union. Workers who are paid on an hourly basis do no turn up for work. Civil servants, administrative staff, tradesman and apprentices are not involved in the dispute. The strike, which is a serious blow to the government and to the Falkland Islands Company, the two largest employers, stems from the employers' intention to withdraw the cost of living bonus scheme, a regular addition to the wage packet. The government and FIC claim that the bonus is a luxury that the country cannot afford as long as the economy is in a depressed state.

A Royal Navy helicopter carrying the Governor, Rex Hunt, and his wife, Mavis, on a visit to South Georgia crashes while landing on the Island. When coming in to land, the aircraft belonging to HMS *Endurance* is caught in a powerful down-draft. Unable to gain any lift, the machine hits the ground with some force, sending metal parts flying over many yards. Mr and Mrs Hunt and the crew, although shaken, escape uninjured, the Governor reports upon his return to the Falklands.

A local branch of the Royal Society for the prevention of cruelty to animals is formed. The committee consists of Fred Clark, John Leonard, Graham Bound, Hilary Blyth and Peggy Halliday.

Penguin News reports a welcome comedy in the long running production known as the Falklands/Argentina dispute. During a speech, British Ambassador to Buenos Aires, Anthony Williams, says that sovereignty is "down at the bottom of the matter" in the Falklands dispute. Editor Graham Bound reports, "Argentines took this to mean that ownership of the Islands was of almost negligible importance, and the offhand remark resulted in outrage. Secretary General of the Radical Party, Luis Leon, demanded the immediate expulsion of the Ambassador and getting, one suspects, a little carried away, the editor of one magazine demanded war."

And getting, one suspects, a little carried away, the editor of one magazine demanded war." Vice Commodore Hector Gilobert hosts a party in the recently-constructed LADE house to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the establishment of an air service between Stanley and Comodoro Rivadavia.

Fifteen years ago - January 24, 1992

THE Islands are in the middle of a heatwave. The West Store reports a run on suntan lotion and sun hats as the temperature soars to 29.2C and a day with 14.6 hours of sunshine means many red faces around the place.

From this month, it is announced, all new born babies can be immunised against Haemophillus Influenza B infection, a bacteria that causes meningitis and serious chest and throat infections. Fortunately HIB infection is fairly rare, about one or two a decade in the Falklands, Chief Medical Officer Roger Diggle says.

DAP announces its new plane and new schedule for flights to Punta Arenas in Chile. The Beech King Air will not only give customers a more comfortable ride but a faster one too, the airline says, reducing flight time by at least an hour.

HMS Polar Circle, the successor to HMS Endurance sails into Stanley for a few hours on her way south. Endurance is now up for sale. The Biggs family celebrates 150 years in the Islands. Covering four generations of the family, more than two hundred people crowd into the Town Hall to celebrate. Eight generations of the family have lived in the Islands and four were represented at the party. A fifth, too young to stay out so late, stayed at home.

Understanding traumatic stress

MANY people will experience trauma at some stage in their lives. Traumatic events can be described as any experience which stretches our mental, physical and emotional capacity to or beyond the limit. Trauma can be either deliberate or unintentional, for example, victims of violence or crime, manmade disasters and wars or victims of accidents, unexpected deaths, natural disasters or being a witness to a horrific event.

Stress reactions are common following exposure to a trauma. Stress reactions involve an activation of the anxiety system or fight/ flight response.

flight response. Some common reactions to trauma include numbness and shock, fear, mood changes, anger, guilt, feeling edgy, problems with sleep, nightmares, reduced concentration and a sense of helplessness, of not being in control of your own life. Most stress reactions will subside over the weeks and months following the traumatic experience. If these symptoms persist for more than three months after the trauma then the person may have developed Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) is a condition characterised by the persistent presence of stress symptoms, avoidance of anything that reminds you of the trauma and an inability to lead a normal social and occupational life.

Treatments

Treatment for Stress Reactions and PTSD may involve taking medication. Medication can ease the symptoms of a Stress Reaction or PTSD and can be extremely helpful, for example short term use of a sleeping tablet to help with insomnia, or an antidepressant to help lift your mood and relieve anxiety symptoms. Various forms of talking treatments are also recommended. Cognitive Behaviour Therapy (CBT) and Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR) are the two most researched and evidence based treatments available.

CBT works by carefully assessing and identifying how a persons thoughts, feelings and behaviour have changed following the trauma. Then a variety of techniques and strategies can be taught to help the person alleviate the symptoms. EMDR works by helping the

EMDR works by helping the brain to reprocess the traumatic experience and shift the memory from current to past memory, i.e. people often say, 'it is like it happened vesterday, I can remember every detail, even if the trauma occurred I year ago, 5, 10 or even 20 + years ago. This ability to recall the fine details and the all the feelings associated with the trauma can imply that the memory has got stuck in the wrong part of the brain

Stuck in the wrong part of the brain. EMDR treatment has been likened to REM sleep. REM sleep is thought to be an essential part of our deep sleep pattern when *rapid* eve movement helps us to process our experiences from the previous day. EMDR also involves a series of rapid eye movements or hand taps and this can help us to reprocess our disturbing memories in the same way.

Both CBT and EMDR are available here in the Falkland Islands.

Wool report - week ending January 19 by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices continued their upward surge at sales in South Africa. New Zealand and Australia last week.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, price increases were greatest for fleece wool lots finer than 25 micron with increases of 4 to 30 pence per kilogram clean recorded. Broader lots increased in value slightly, generally gaining 1 to 2 p/kg clean for the week. Very broad lots however struggled to hold value

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up approximately 15 pence per kilogram at 384.8 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 370.4 pence per kilogram clean.

Heavy buying demand from China as well as reduced wool supply projections for the coming wool season contributed to the continuation of the wool markets "bull run" according to industry analysts.

In an interesting overall wool industry comment. Chinese wool buyers and processors are reported to be dismayed over problems associated with poor clip preparation standards of wool purchased through the Australian auction system. Dark and medullated fibre contamination is reported to be of particular concern

As detailed in the "Wool Record Weekly", Chinese processors are "very interested in buying supplies from growers or groups that can guarantee the quality of deliveries". This is obviously in response to their stated concerns over clip preparation standards.

While it is not suggested that Chinese concern over Australian clip preparation standards presents an immediate opportunity for Falkland Islands farmers, the issue is believed to be represent a reminder of the importance of both "best practice" clip preparation and also the need to be able to "prove" the use of best practice methodology.

the need to be able to prove the case of best practice methodology. Adherence to the Falkland Islands guide to clip preparation and participation in the QFW and DOA wool classing and clip documentation schemes are mechanisms for your farms wool selling agent or broker to provide buyers and processors with such "quality assurance" for your Falkland Islands wool.

In Australia 95% of the 68,932 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 9.773 bales of crossbred wool of which 93% was sold. In South Africa 96% of the 7.430 bales available were sold.

7,430 bales available were sold. Next week approximately 78,000 bales of wool will be available for sale in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia Note:





THE Falklands' new protection ship, HMS *Clyde*, has been officially accepted into service by the Royal Navy.

In a service held in Portsmouth on Wednesday, the Royal Navy's newest warship was inspected by Captain Colin Welborn, who is in charge of all the Navy's patrol ships, and the White Ensign was raised for the first time, heralding the arrival of the new Falkland Islands Patrol Vessel.

Clyde's Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Commander Simon Hopper, was then given permission to continue the ship's trials and training in preparation for her planned deployment to the South Atlantic in the winter.

He said, "Today is a milestone in the life of HMS *Clyde* and a proud moment for her ship's company who have worked so hard to get her ready. "We now have a top class ves-

sel that we are all looking forward to proving is up to the task and working-up ready for her deployment later in the year."

Over the next few months HMS Clyde and her company will go

Cruiser grounds in Antarctica

through a rigorous series of trials and safety training before undergoing Operational Sea Training in Scotland.

She will hold her official commissioning ceremony just prior to deploying to the Falklands, where she will remain until at least 2012, relieving the current Falkland Islands Protection Vessel, HMS Dumbarton Castle, which is due to retire after the handover.

Clyde is capable of operating a variety of aircraft from her flight deck, including Merlin and Sea King helicopters.

Head-less school?

THE recruitment of a new Headteacher for the Community School has hit problems.

The Director of Education, Barbara Booth, this week confirmed a preferred candidate had been selected, however, "...as we were going through the pre-contract checks, he had to withdraw on health grounds."

The Acting Headteacher is due to leave the Islands later this month; Mrs Booth said she is working with the Chief Executive and Senior Managers at the school, "...collectively looking at the options to carry on effective management." She added that advertisements for the job are to be published in professional publications from today.

Penguin News asked Mrs Booth about rumours that unqualified people were being called in to teach classes. She was clear this was not the case.

A NORWEGIAN cruise ship carrying almost 300 passengers ran aground in the Antarctic on Wednesday, badly damaging its hull. No one was injured.

His Excellency the Governor, Mr Alan Huckle, reported that MS Nordkapp sustained "significant damage" to her hull and the underside of her keel when she ran aground at Deception Island, part of the South Shetland Islands archipelago in Antarctica.

The 285 passengers, including 15 British nationals, were transferred to *Nordkapp*'s sister ship, MS *Nordnorge* and have been taken to Ushuaia from where they will be flown home by the ship's owners.

The Royal Navy's ice ship, HMS Endurance, headed to Deception Island and sent divers down to inspect the damage. The Nordkapp headed off to a safer anchorage at King George Island, followed by HMS *Endurance* who had taken on the cruise ship's non-essential crew.

These passengers were dropped off at the island and will be picked up by another ship to travel back to South America.

Mr Huckle said that the grounding had badly damaged the ship's outer hull, however the internal hull was not damaged. There was some oil spillage, he said, and booms have been deployed around the vessel.

He reported, "There was limited spillage at Deception Island, a low number of tonnes of light fuel oil, but this is likely to have evaporated very quickly."

It is possible that the British Antarctic Survey ship, RRS James Clark Ross, will call in at Deception to carry out environmental impact assessments, Mr Huckle added.

Fishery turns 20

THE Falklands fishery officially turned twenty this week.

The first fishing zone (FICZ) around the Falkland Islands was declared in October 1986 and the fishing licence regime became effective on February 1, 1987.

A number of events are being organised to mark and celebrate 20 years of the fishery operating in Falkland Islands Conservation Zones.

The Director of Fisheries, John Barton said the main event will be a mass gathering of Falkland Islands-registered fishing vessels on Saturday, February 24. "There are currently 23 fishing vessels registered in Stanley, and it is hoped that almost 20 of these will be present in Stanley and Port William on the day."

It is planned that there will be a Falkland Islands-registered trawler, jigger and longliner berthed at FIPASS on the day and open to the public for tours, Mr Barton said.

"This is a great opportunity to see the three main vessel types and fishing methods used in Falkland Conservation Zones," he commented.

A public talk on '20 years of the fishery' is to be held on February 22, at the Chamber of Commerce.

Crown calls in

NORWEGIAN Crown heads the list of cruise ships due to visit this week. She will be in Stanley today, bringing approximately 1,250 passengers.

Tomorrow, *Explorer II* (with approximately 200 passengers) will berth at FIPASS and on Sunday, *Minerva II* (838) will be in town.

Clipper Adventurer will spend Monday at Carcass Island and New Island, while Minerva II will be at West Point Island and Infinity (1,800) will be in Stanley.

Akademik Sergey Vavilov (80) will be at Carcass Island and Saunders Island on Tuesday while Prinsendam (840) will be in Stanley.

On Wednesday Akademik Sergev Vavilov and Akademik loffe (100) will visit Stanley and Professor Multanovskiy (49) will visit Carcass Island and New Island.

Thursday is a busy day for Stanley, with visits from Professor Multanovskiv, Rotterdam (1,600), Deutshland (560) and Costa Romantica (1,668). Akademik Ioffe will spend Thursday at Bleaker Island and Sea Lion Island.

I WAS pleased to hear that councillors are looking at linking the revocability of Falkland Islands status (see right) to the justice system - traitors and murderers beware.

At one of the many public meetings held last month to discuss the review of the Constitution, there was a clear body of opinion that status should be something to withdraw if we hit tough times. In other words, if the economy crashed or some similar disaster befell us, we could ship out a certain class of status holders.

To me - admittedly safely clutching my immovable status, being the daughter of an Islander - this idea was troubling.

I'm not being naive: I realise we regularly exercise positive discrimination in the Falklands - Islanders get first dibs on jobs, for example - but I don't think we nor any other country should get away with evicting citizens not fortunate enough to have the 'birth right' when its economy experiences a down turn. How could anyone have the confidence to invest their future - and family - in the Islands if they could end up having the rug pulled out from underneath them?

If the risk of unemployment is the motivation behind the reasoning for this opinion, is not the use of work permits adequate insurance?

Perhaps this is all rather a moot point anyway; if things do go pear shaped, such a measure as revoking status would more than likely not need to be taken.

I wouldn't dare refer to rats and ships, but one could expect that a number of people would naturally head elsewhere to seek their fortune were we to hit bad times.

THE presence of so many journalists in one place has lent Stanley a slightly surreal atmosphere. While people aren't necessarily getting around with bigger smiles or shinier shoes than usual, I think most are probably aware of the importance of presenting the Falklands in a positive and accurate light.

For, to a degree, we are at their mercy: they are our direct line to the UK public and the angle they choose to take on stories can make the difference on how the UK tax payer sees us.

Take, for instance, the issue of landmines. Regardless of whether we want it, millions may be spent on the clearance of mines here; should the press put the wrong slant on the story - about money being wasted yet again on those ridiculous people clinging to a rock at the bottom of the world - we could lose the support of the British public overnight.

So, if you're collared on the street or meet a journo over a beer in the pub, please don't shy away from telling them how it really is here. (Big smile and shiny shoes are entirely at your discretion.)



Constitutional review looks at status

FOLLOWING a round of public consultation, Councillors' have been meeting to discuss the review of the Constitution and the way forward.

They met last Friday to discuss issues ranging from the age of compulsory education to constituency boundaries. They will continue their talks today (Friday).

The longest discussion during last week's meeting was on the subject of Commonwealth citizens. The provisions of the Constitution as they stand require someone to be either a naturalised British citizen or a Commonwealth citizen to be able to become an elector or an election candidate and to apply for status.

There are alternatives to requiring this Commonwealth citizenship, Councillor Summers said, and the committee held a long discussion on these. "On the one hand you could just open it up to anybody to become a Falklands citizen; the effect of that is that you could have any number of foreign nationals having Falklands status, because gaining that doesn't require you to give up your original nationality.

"The other approach is to say, this is a British Territory, we have a British culture and ethos, we believe the overwhelming aspiration of the majority of people will be to maintain this as a British Territory, why shouldn't we require every body to be a British citizen before they gain status? But some people from places such as Australia or New Zealand might not be happy with that approach. "It's difficult to know which way to go, indeed we didn't reach a conclusion. It's an issue which we would like the public to debate."

Although councillors were undecided on this issue, CIIr Summers said they were united that the current Commonwealth citizen requirement, "...is not terribly relevant."

Revocation

The Select Committee is in agreement that, in certain circumstances, revocation of Falkland Islands status should be permitted, Cllr Summers reported, and it is likely this will be linked to the Courts.

He explained, "You could say, if it's something for which you might reasonably be put in jail for more than ten years, or fifteen years, or twenty years - whatever we decide we'll try and link it to that. We'll try and come up with some classes of offence that would cause you to be deported and have your status revoked."

At present, people who are absent from the Islands for more than two years can risk losing their status and councillors feel this should change. Instead, Clir Summers reported, it is likely that people returning after a long absence would not automatically be entitled to all the perks which go with it. He explained, "You may still

He explained, "You may still have your status, which would give you the right to live here and own property and the right to vote. but you wouldn't necessarily be entitled to free medical treatment, education, etc."

Vacancy advertising gives residents advantage

FOLLOWING some local debate about the advertising of job vacancies, the head of the Immigration Department has attempted to explain the law.

Principal Immigration Officer Pete King says if an employment vacancy in the Islands is to be filled by a person who would require a work permit, the requirements of section 17(7A) of the Immigration Ordinance 1999 will apply. "This means that the Principal Immigration Officer may require the vacancy to be advertised.

"The purpose of advertising is so that the attention of Falkland Islands residents may be drawn to the vacancy, and so that they may choose to apply for the vacancy.

"The advert may also be considered by a person in the Islands working with the benefit of a work permit, and they may also choose to apply for the vacancy, therefore potentially benefiting from the opportunity to seek promotion or to change employment."

If, after advertising, the employer wishes to appoint a person who does not have the right of residence in the Falkland Islands, Mr

Extra Liberation holiday

JUNE 15, the day after Liberation Day, has been declared a public holiday for 2007, in recognition of the 20th Anniversary of the Falklands War.

Executive Council approved the move at its meeting last week.

King may require the employer to satisfy him that it is necessary to engage that person, rather than a person who has a right of residence in the Falkland Islands.

Complaints have been received about the style of some adverts for employment vacancies with some people feeling that the adverts are intended to deter people from applying for, or enquiring about the job vacancy.

This matter was considered by the Immigration Working Group. Mr King said. "The group concluded that the majority of adverts are acceptable, however the following guidance was offered.

"An advert should accurately reflect the requirements of the vacant position. An advert should not be written in a style which is likely to deter persons from applying for the position, or from making enquiries about it. "

Phrases like: "in order to conform with immigration requirements..." or "in connection with work permit renewals..." are not acceptable. Mr King said, and if they are used he may require the employer to re-advertise the vacancy.

A CONCERTED effort is being made to better preserve historic Falklands sites, to enable more people to enjoy and learn about them.

At a meeting of General Purposes Committee held last week, Councillor Richard Stevens expressed concern at the marked deterioration in the condition of some of the historic sites on East Falkland - such as the corrals at Cerritos, Egg Harbour and Kelp Creek - which has occurred as the road network has grown.

Holder of the heritage portfolio, Cllr Richard Davies said he does not feel the damage has been caused by vandalism; instead, he said, "It's probably more a case of perhaps not treating them with quite as much respect as we'd like..." The growth of the road network

should present an opportunity, not a threat, Clir Davies believes. "It enables more people to go and see these parts of our heritage." Following discussions with Gov-

ernment Archivist, Jane Cameron and Museum Manager, Leona Roberts, Cllr Davis said they would like to list Falklands corrals. Darwin and Spring Point corrals are al-

ready listed. "We feel that listing is the way ahead as it starts to give some protection and we've got some mechanisms in place for protecting listed structures

Cllr Davies said he believes that if there is signage in place telling people about the history and the significance of the structure, they will treat it with a bit more respect. Cllr Davies said it was also their

intention to talk to Landholdings to encourage them to apply for listing of their historic sites

He said a number of ideas had been bandied about and it was thought the Pastfinders group could do a "corral clean up", similar to the work Falklands Conservation Watch Group does.

He said that he did not know how much work was involved in re-pairing the corrals but he hoped that they might be able to draw on the skills of a number of people who learned to build dry stone walls a few years ago and perhaps get a group of volunteers together to do some repair work and camp at the site

"What a great way to spend a weekend," said Cllr Davies.

Around the west in twenty-four hours



Bill Porter and Chris Lloyd set off to circumnavigate the West

CHRIS Lloyd and Bill Porter have travelled around the West in Bill's small boat

They set off from Fox Bay on Friday, January 26 at 6.30am and headed south. They paused by Bird Island and travelled through the famous landmark known as the Horse Block

They got to Shallow Harbour at 1.45pm having travelled 97 miles that day, refuelled and stayed the night. They set off again at 9am heading to Hill Cove. On their way they called in to First Passage for a look around and stopped at West Point

They got to Hill Cove at 5pm with no problems, having covered approximately 60 miles and got fuel from Jen Harvey

On Sunday morning, after re-turning to Fox Bay for the night,

they set off for Saunders Island at 8am. It took only 40 minutes to reach Saunders and after spending two hours there, they began the 70 mile jaunt to Port Howard.

All was going well until they got out by Broken Island, when one of the motors on the boat broke down. They carried on despite this, and reached Port Howard at 6.45pm.

Bill and Chris again made the overland journey to Fox Bay for the night. The next morning they went back to Port Howard and left at 9am for the 36 mile leg of the expedition to Fox Bay, with only one motor.

Five and three quarter hours later they were back on dry land at Fox Bay, having circumnavigated West Falkland. The adventurous pair covered a distance of approximately 270 miles in 24 hours in a small open boat.

Stanley harbour plays host to Adele



THE Adele is owned by Jan-Eric Osterlund from Sweden and named after his mother. Built in Holland in 2005 the magnificent yacht has a length of 55 metres, a beam of 9.5 meters and the main mast is 62 metres. The *Adele* can cruise at speeds in excess of 14 knots under sail, is equipped with a 12 cylinder Caterpillar main engine and has a range of 6,500 nautical miles under power. She is due to sail soon for a voyage to South Georgia.

Your questions answered

Q WHERE is it permissible and where is it not permissible for unlicensed drivers to drive in relation licensed/ to designated roads?

There is a view that legislation states that an unlicensed driver cannot drive within a certain distance of a licensed/designated road - is this correct?

When was the hard area to the west of Stanley Airport designated as a licensed road, and if it is a designated road should it have debris such as old tyres spread across it?

Crown Counsel Robert McMasters provided the following response.

A Unlicensed drivers are not permitted to drive on any designated roads on the Islands. A road in law is defined as "any street, thoroughfare, highway, lane, court, alley, passage, or open place used or frequented by the public, or to which the public have or are permitted to have access in Stanley or within a radius of four miles of the boundary thereof". A road can also be a public place declared by the Governor to be a road by order.

There is no requirement in law that an unlicensed driver cannot drive within a certain distance of a road. It should however be remembered that a road can be widely defined to include an open space and not simply a highway.

The hard standing to the west of Stanley airport is classed as a road by virtue of the fact that it is an open place to which the public have access and is within a four mile radius of the boundary of Stanley. As such it has been classed as a road using a test that has been in place since 1948. The fact that it may have debris upon it does not affect its legal designation.

It should be added that provisional licence holders may drive upon roads so long as they are supervised by a full licence holder who has held such a licence for at

least two years.

Q CAN anyone explain the sudden demise of The Archers and what, if anything, is being done to get them reinstated?

The Archers has always had a special place on BFBS Radio 2 and we still bring Archers fans a weekly visit to Borchester and Ambridge each Sunday at 10am UK time.

FIRS Station Manager Corina Bishop added:

"I am waiting for a quote from BBC International to find out how much it will cost to receive The Archers and expect to have an answer towards the end of the month.

"Reinstating The Archers will very much depend on the cost as there is no provision in the current budget.

Government housing for Hansen Hill

A FIRM decision has been made to allocate the site at Hansen Hill for government housing.

It now sits with the Public Works Department to prepare designs for the site and decide how many two-bedroom terraced houses will fit.

It is hoped that there is space for up to seven houses and there are funds in the capital programme for it, Councillor Mike Summers told the Housing Committee during a brief update of the housing strategy on Wednesday.

These houses will be available to people to rent and there are no plans to build any more houses for the social or contract pool, said Mr Summers.

Also at the Housing Committee

meeting, a minor change to the housing points system has been agreed following a recommendation by the Housing Officer.

Dawn Hoy recommended that the points system should include annual increments of one point per year following an applicant's 40th birthday. She said the suggestion was prompted by the fact that Standard Chartered Bank mortgages have to be paid off by the mortgagee's 64th birthday and therefore the chance of people obtaining a mortgage diminishes as they get older.

She said this addition to the system would give some hope to people who feel that they may be housed at places such as Lookout Lodge forever.

Complaints commission: paper to ExCo in February

THE establishment of a complaints procedure has been up for discussion at Gilbert House.

Councillors met with the Governor and Chief Executive this month to discuss how a complaints commission might work and who should be involved in it. The Chief Executive is to produce a paper on the issue for Executive Council next month.

Councillor Mike Summers said he and his colleagues stressed the need for the commission to be independent of Executive Council and the government's decisionmaking procedures.

Whilst saying it should be an open process, he added, "There are issues about how complaints get referred in the first place - you can't just have a system where anybody in the population can willy nilly go and badger the Complaints Commissioner about this, that and the other thing - they'd just get overwhelmed."

Who the Complaints Commissioner would report to was also discussed, Councillor Summer said, "...and it rather looks as though there may be different options for different types of complaint and different types of outcome. In some instances, he might report to Executive Council when there are issues about the structure or policies of government that appear not to be working in the way that we've foreseen, or he might need to report to the Governor if there are issues to do with disciplinary procedures and processes.

Quality of governance

Neil Carey from the National Audit Office recently visited the Falklands to look at the quality of government delivered by the Foreign Office in terms of their activities in the Overseas Territories. It is part of a report from the National Audit Office on behalf of Parliament

Councillor Summers said he and his colleagues expressed their concern at the mobility of Foreign Office staff: "Anyone that comes to the Falklands desk stays a very short time; people who come and sit at the hydrocarbons desk and fisheries desk are there for a very short time and tend to be relatively junior staff.

"We are not entirely convinced that delivers good governance.

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Stamp issue celebrates fisheries success over two decades Betts for mayor?



TO CELEBRATE the success of the Falklands Fisheries the Post Office has released a special commemorative stamp issue.


The lower three values (3p, 11p and 25p) provide us with a glimpse of life aboard a busy fishing vessel in favourable conditions.

The 3p stamp depicts a busy day at sea for both the fishermen and the Falkland Islands Protection Vessel. Dorada, which can be seen in the background.

The 11p shows that work aboard continues well into the night, if not all night, and the 25p shows fishermen ending their shift

after a long day at sea. The 30p is a Japanese jigger in Stanley Harbour where licenses are collected prior to fishing within the conservation zone. The Japanese jigger targets the illex, the larger of the squid, which are extremely popular in the Far East. The ships work at night using high powered lights to attract the squid to the surface

It's something that's passed on generation after genera-tion: England has an absolute right over the territory and nobody questioned if it was true or not

Alex Betts has on occasions been a member of the annual Argentine delegation before the United Na-tions Decolonisation Committee and has spoken in support of Ar-gentina's sovereignty claim over the Falklands. MP

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
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The 'yomper' comes back to Stanley

WHEN Peter Robinson attached the Union Flag to his radio aerial ready to yomp into Stanley on June 14, 1982, little did he know he was to become an iconic image of the war for decades to come.

He was captured back-on, walking into Stanley with the flag flying behind him by photographer Pete Holdgate and the picture, now known as 'The Yomper' became one of the most famous of the war.

Peter was back in the Islands last week, taking a BBC television crew back through the 1982 yomp from San Carlos when he landed with 40 Commando but was detached to join 45 Commando.

The photograph was taken on the road to Moody Brook, heading away from Two Sisters to Stanley. Peter says he remembers it being taken "vividly"

He has been back with the BBC team, headed by Dan Snow, to film material which will be broadcast as part of the live coverage planned for June 17.

Peter took Dan through the walk, "...putting what we did into perspective." At one point he loaded him up with gear to help him understand the weight the men carried when they yomped. Dan said this insight gave him a "new respect" for the men in the Task Force: "It was just extraordinary."

Peter plans to be at Horseguards for the commemorations, as does Dan, who added, "I want to see how the British react -I hope they come out in huge numbers. After all, the war was fought in our name."



Keep Stanley safe for the children

HAVING just read last week's PN I am in full agreement with the editorial following the public meeting, over the sad thought of children not being able to walk to school safely.

I obviously wasn't at the debate to hear the ages of these children, I wouldn't have let my youngest walk alone anyway - he is too immature at seven to fully appreciate the damage speed can do. However, I can't wait to get back to Stanley where my nine year old can walk the streets safely to school, clubs, swimming pool or even from one end of town to the other on a Saturday with friends.

If you think it is too dangerous, and your child is mature enough to be walking alone, surely it is easier to report the drivers who are causing the danger than deprive that child of the chance of some independence.

My children have certainly appreciated being allowed the freedom of Stanley, and are very careful on the roads in Cornwall, but I don't let them walk to after school clubs alone - because of the traffic volume, not the risk of abduction!

We do walk to school sometimes - it takes half an hour through beautiful woodlands, until we have to walk along the main road where the cars really do speed, and so fast you can't catch the number plate.

Keep your 25miles per hour speed limit in Stanley, anything higher and people seem to think they can then add a few extra miles per hour on top.

So, please don't take away that first step to independence: follow your child discreetly for the first few days, report the dangerous drivers, and keep Stanley as safe for everyone as it has been until now.

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News from Executive Council

Councillor Andrea Clausen reports on the January meeting

Sheltered housing space earmarked

AN AREA behind the historic Police Cottages has been earmarked for sheltered housing.

It was initially intended that the cottages could be sold with conditions relating to their status as listed buildings, however following an unsuccessful tender process, it was decided to retain them and consideration was given to their conversion into sheltered accommodation.

Executive Councillor Andrea Clausen said that, for a number of reasons, conversion to sheltered accommodation units has been deemed impractical and so members have agreed that Police Cottages would be retained and rented as social housing accommodation. .. including, where this is possible, sheltered housing needs cases

Members further agreed to reserve the area of land to the south of Police Cottages, Cllr Clausen said, which is currently used as communal space and partially occupied by peat sheds, for sheltered housing development at an appropriate stage

The funds required to carry out the upgrade and refurbishment of number 3 and 4 Police Cottages are to be included in the Capital Budget for 2007/08

Dockyard

A proposal to adopt the Dockyard Development Brief as Supplementary Planning guidance was considered and accepted by Executive Council but with the some additional requests. Cllr Clausen reported.

"Firstly, that the overall custody of this project be considered by the Falkland Island Development Board, and that FIDC lead a multi-disciplinary team (including Museum and National Trust, FITB, Chamber of Commerce, etc) to investigate the prospects of commercial sponsorship and take this project forward.'

Cllr Clausen said Executive Councillors recognise that the Museum and National Trust will be principle tenants of this site, but felt that it now needed to be led by our development agency.

Members also requested that the possibility of dockside flats was considered in the overall development plan.

Aerials

A proposal to make a General Development (Amendment) Order 2006 was also approved at the Executive Council meeting

The purpose of these amendments is to allow domestic users to erect radio and television aerials adhering to relevant criteria without having to apply for planning permission.

These amendments will not apply to listed buildings, to properties affected by Article 5 Directions, to buildings in multiple occupancy (e.g. flats) or to commercial or other non-residential premises

Occupiers of these premises will still be able to erect a television or radio aerial provided they apply and are granted planning permission

PRPs moratorium announced

A MORATORIUM is to be placed on the issue of Permanent Residence Permits.

The move will allow time for the completion of the immigration points system and related legislation, Clir Clausen said, "...whilst protecting the interests of the Falkland Islands from harm, or potential harm, caused by the continued issue of Permanent Residence Permits in the absence of a clear and appropriate policy regulating their issue.

The proposed suspension order will also include an exemption from its effects in relation to any Permanent Residence Permit already lodged and the fee paid by January 25, 2007 so that those applications may be processed and a permit issued, if appropriate, in the normal manner.

Cllr Clausen said Elected Members have wished to introduce a moratorium on the receipt and consideration of Permanent Residence Permits for some time, for a number of reasons.

These include the recent reduced income in the fisheries sector along with its continued volatility: concern about the availability and future availability of jobs in the economy at a level that would be attractive to local residents and returning students, for example administrative and clerical jobs (although there is a need for research into the job market and the level of unemployment); existing immigration systems have not adapted fast enough over time and do not provide effective controls over permanent immigration."

Cllr Clausen said she and her colleagues wish to replace the Permanent Residence Permit as soon as possible with an Extended Residence Permit, "...to ensure that Commonwealth citizens apply for Falkland Island Status under the provisions of the Ordinance 1998 before they acquire Status by being naturalised as a British Overseas Territories Citizen under the provisions of the British Nationality Act 1981."

Potential developers to be consulted on housing plan

THE government's future housing provision strategy was up for consideration by Executive Council.

Members approved that the construction industry, land owners and potential developers now be consulted on the proposed housing strategy and that a further report be submitted to the March meeting of Executive Council on the outcome of the consultation process.

Cllr Clausen said a number of specific proposals are made in the strategy. These include, for example:

 serviced plots will continue to be provided for private sector development on a subsidised basis, and that the level of infrastructure subsidy be formula based;

· the same level of subsidy will be available to private sector developers for infrastructure on land in private ownership:

there will be provision for subsidy claw-back in all cases;

· FIG will develop and operate

Registry inherits Co-operative duties

RESPONSIBILITY for carrying out the duties of the Registrar of Co-operative Societies has reverted from the Attorney General's Chambers to the Registry.

This responsibility has been with the Attorney General's Chambers since 1999, but the increased workload on that department means the role has come under pressure

Cllr Clausen said Executive Councillors considered it "sensible" for this role to revert to the Registrar General, "...who has both the manpower and the procedures in place to carry out this task and can make these files avail-



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

Blisters, boredom and sunburn: 10 marathons in 10 days

IN EARLY December, two policemen embarked on an unenviable mission - to walk the equivalent of ten marathons

in as many days. Leading Police Constable Gary 'Guido' Webb and Reserve Police Constable Steve Dent chose three organisations to support through the walk - the Stephen Jaffray Memorial Fund. the South Atlantic Medal Asso-ciation and The Shack.

To date they have raised and banked just over £1600, however they know of at least an-other £400 which remains uncollected.

In his diary from the walk, Guido takes us through the highs and lows of the "West to East" challenge.

AFTER three months of planning the day has arrived to start the trek. Where has the time gone?

We left Stanley at 9am on Sun-day, December 3, aiming to arrive at Mount Pleasant for 10am, for the safety briefing to travel on the British International helicopters.

Helen Wallace was our driver for the morning with co-driver Beth Reid. I believe Helen was glad to get rid of us that morning: with two driving examiners in the vehicle. this turned out to be her longest hour.

Waiting for us at the Heli Flight was our second safety/support driver. Cpl Luke Dallison, from the RAF Dog Section. He would be as-sisting our current Stanley Military Police Liaison Officer. Cpl Mike "Ernie" Wise, in making sure that we would be looked after.

Luke had us in laughter within minutes - a man that works with dogs, but hates them, also doesn't like flying, but joined the RAF. You just knew that this would be a long eight days away.

The weather today was hot, hopefully not a prelude to what was going to come, it would just make the walking unbearable.

We finally boarded the flight at 11.45, flying over Mt Alice, Weddell and Beaver Islands, before heading north to Hill Cove and our drop off. The pilot did a good job showing us our route: I have a strong belief that he was taunting us.

At Hill Cove we met up with Peter Nightingale, who generously loaned us a Land Rover for the West

leg of our journey. The first night was spent with Becky and Critta Lee. The early evening for Steve and I was spent

sorting out our kit and rations for went for a spell of fishing, much to the fishes' entertainment, as neither had a clue what to do.

A feeling of nerves descended, so much expectation to succeed, not only for the charities and the an-ticipated money raised, but also to silence the doubters.

Day 1, Monday, December 4

After sharing a room with Steve for the night - boy he can snore - it was a 3.45am wake up. A quick cup of coffee, and we started the trek at 4.30am. All systems go.

The first quarter of an hour was spent gossiping between us, but all too soon it went quiet with Steve and 1 finding our own zones, con-templating life. After an hour and a half, we had had to stop twice for two blister breaks for Steve. This gave him ammunition to attack his 1,000 mile socks and their alleged guarantee.

7am, the allotted breakfast break, came around with no sign of the safety wagon. We had given the lads a lie in for the first day, and hoped that they were still not snug-

gled up in their beds. At 7.50am they turned up. There had been a problem with the vehicle already - a flat battery. It was sausage and beans for breakfast (something that we would get used to and loath as the trek went on).

The morning walk was fine, the weather being overcast, but come midday, the sun was up and it was hot. Having traveled 35kms, it was time to stop for lunch. It was so hot that a change of clothes were in order, time for the shorts, a decision that Steve and I would regret for a few days to come.

After an hour's break we were on the road again. Time for the MP3's to be plugged in for the last trek of the day, I think we can say that singing is not our speciality, but we thought we were good: this seemed to be the course of action for every day to follow!

At 2.30pm we arrived at the Hill Cove turnoff, having gone a little further than intended for the day. but this was the natural break point. Time to make our way to Hill Cove and overnight with Olive.

Day 2 - Tuesday, December 5 This was an early start - 3am reveille, and on the road out of Hill Cove at 3.45am. Another night of little sleep thanks to Steve's snoring. However he was in pillow range last night and he got it; to my bemusement, he picked it up,

promptly cuddled up to it and continued snoring - Janice you have my full sympathy. The option of going outside in the tent was starting to look good. We started walking from the

junction at 4.30am. The sun was just coming up, and it looked stunning, all the low clouds in the valleys, very scenic.

Reveille 3.30am - yippce, a lie in. On the road and walking again at 4.30am. Sun up at 5am, but this quickly passed and the black clouds loomed ahead. No luck of rain, and a chance to cool down, overhead they passed. A time for cursing. The wind was blowing from the

north, so hitting us side on. A time to look forward to the Spring Point turnoff as we would head south, with the wind behind us, and a push along the long straight. Boy, the luck was against us, no

sooner did we turn south then the wind did a 180 turn, head wind all the way. This was not good, as this phase of the walk was going up and down the hills.

Lunch was at the Port Edgar turnoff, and some shelter from the containers. On restarting we passed the turnoff for Stoney Ridge Farm and our overnight stay with James and Jennifer. We weren't expecting it to be so close, so confusion reigned and a long look at the map. Not far to go until the end of the

day. Time for Steve and I to have our first falling out - well for Steve to lose his teddy bear - the final hill to conquer. Around the south side of Stoney Ridge Hill and it was all over for the day.

Marathon Number three down.

Today turned out to be a hot one; by 6.30 it was fully ablaze, and we were walking in t-shirts and Factor 30 on. It was nice to have the sun for a second day running, but it was just too hot to walk, or certainly put in the miles we wanted 10

Luke amazed us with his driving prowess today, by driving off a straight piece of road in Lakelands and nearly rolling the vehicle, a feat that cannot be explained.

Dinner was noon; this was a welcome break, time to find some shade. At this point we were just short of Fox Bay.

When walking resumed Fox Bay came into sight, and I succumbed to the heat - dehydration, and all my fault. A water bottle over the head to cool down and plenty of fluids later, it was time to crack on. Turning right at the junction, we finally stopped for the day at the boundary of Lake Sulivan Farm.

Marathon Number Two down. Overnight at Ben and Clare Cockwell's.

Day 3 - Wednesday, December 6

Now followed a bright idea by Steve: let's drive to Albemarle to check the next day's route, as the support wagon would be leaving in the morning to go back to Peter, so we would be on our own.

We didn't go far as Peter's wagon finally gave up the ghost. The prop shaft fell off. It was a time Luke had been waiting for, a time to come good and show his true talents. Steve and I just collapsed on the side of the bank and waited for the AA to arrive - courtesy of Mt Alice.



Wool market report for week ending January 26 By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices fell quite significantly at auctions in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia last week.

As shown in the Micron Price Guide table (below), price falls were greatest for fleece wool lots finer than 24 micron with falls of between 18 and 28 pence per kilogram clean recorded. Broader lots were not affected as badly, with falls of between 3 and 8 pence per kilogram clean during the week

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down approximately 18 pence per kilogram at 367.5 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 384.8 pence per kilogram clean.

A number of wool analysts have indicated that a market "correction" was not totally unexpected given the scale and speed of recent price increases.

It has also been reported that there has been a massive increase in short term supply of wool from farmers onto the market. It is obvious that this increase in wool supply is the result of farmers rushing wool that has been stored on their farms and in broker's warehouses onto the market in an attempt to capitalize on recent price increases. Much of this extra wool is last season's wool (older in some cases) and is potentially of inferior guality to new-season wool

As an example of the scale of recent farmer demand to get wool onto the market, Australian auctions over the next few weeks have had their projected volumes of wool to be offered increased by almost 50% for next week, and then 10% for each of the following two weeks

The increase in projected volume of wool onto the market (for the next few weeks) is believed to have removed some of the short term urgency from wool buying. Buyers are now more confident in their ability to fill orders for the next few weeks. This is contrast to the situation prior to the increase in forecast wool supply, where buyers were scrambling to satisfy their commitments.

In spite of the short term impact of a spike in wool supply and the current resistance to the scale of previous price increases. it is very re-assuring to note that mid-term fundamentals appear quite strong for wool prices over the next six or seven months. At the moment demand for wool is relatively firm and projected wool supply for the next year is very low given the enormity of drought conditions in Australia.

In South Africa 90% of the 6,613 bales available were sold. Standard Wool, G Modiano and United Wool very active buying approximately 66% of available wool. In Australia only 81% of the 45,663 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 7,128 bales of crossbred wool of which 84% was sold.

Next week approximately 120,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in New Zealand. South Africa and Australia. Note:

Twenty-two years ago, February 4, 1985

EVERARDS Brewery executives are expected to decide soon whether their subsidiary, the Penguin Ale Brewery, will continue to operate. The business has been less than successful since its inception two years ago and the firm is now going through a serious crisis which will decide its future.

Fish and chips in the Falklands, courtesy of the Hawksworths at the Woodbine Cafe, however, celebrate their first year in the Falklands as a success story after making the move from their business in Barnsley.

A shortage of skills prompts the recently formed Falkland Islands Development Corporation to set up a register for people who want to return to live in the Falklands, have skills required by companies in the Islands or would like to start up their own business supplying goods or services to the expanding local population.

Seventeen years ago, February 2, 1990

HMS Leeds Castle lands a party at Bold Cove to celebrate the 300th anniversary of the first fully-documented landing on the Falklands mainland. A large crowd, having flown, driven, or ridden on horses, gather to commemorate the arrival at the same spot in 1690 of a party from the armed merchantman Welfare, commanded by Captain John Armstrong.

New radio equipment is to be installed at Stanley Police Station which will mean more efficient co-ordination of the emergency serv ices and will particularly help the fisheries and coastguard, says Superintendent Greenland.

He said he was three down at one stage but, "hung on in there," to win two up.



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
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



Police court saga over at last

FIFTEEN months after being suspended from duty, former Chief Police Officer, David Morris, has at last been schenced.

In court on Monday, he received a six month suspended prison sentence, suspended for one year, having been found guilty on November 9, 2006 of perverting the course of justice.

Mr Morris was found to have pressured Inspector Len McGill to terminate a police inquiry into an alleged assault by his son, Jason Morris. On the evening of the verdict, Mr Morris became ill and was admitted to hospital where he remained until his sentencing.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds read the judgment from Acting Senfor Magistrate Patrick Curran QC in open court on Monday. In passing sentence Mr Curran said that Mr Morris's time spent in hospital will be treated as time spent remanded in custody awaiting sentence. This would equate to a prison sentence of slightly more than three months.

In mitigation Defence Lawyer Keith Watson described the case as "tragic." He said that two to five minutes of poor judgment had, in the short to medium term, "ruined a good man's life, not to mention the devastation suffered by his wife and very close family."

In a written submission to Mr Curran, Mr Watson referred to Mr Morris's previous good character: he was discharged from the Royal Ma-

Chevening scholars to visit

SIX Argentines with close links to the UK will be visiting the Islands next week to learn about life here.

The six have all studied in the UK as part of the UK Government's 'Chevening' programme which enables promising foreign graduates to attend British universities for a year.

Acting Governor. Harriet Hall, reported, "The idea for the visit came from the Argentine Association of Chevening Alumni (AChA), and is being facilitated by the British Embassy in Buenos Aires It was discussed with councillors by Howard Pearce during his time as Governor."

The six will be spending time in Stanley and Camp and meeting a range of people to learn about life on the Falkland Islands and to deepen their understanding of Falkland Islanders' views.

Also visiting next week, although with a separate programme, will be Lynda St Cooke from the Embassy in Buenos Aires and Simon Rawson, from the FCO in London. rines in 1983 with an exemplary record. "Mr Morris's conduct in the Royal Falkland Islands Police Force could be described, up to his conviction, with exactly the same word, exemplary," added Mr Watson.

Mr Curran said he had been told Mr Morris now accepts that in acting as he did he made an error of judgment, but that he was unaware he was committing an offence.

"On the evidence it was absolutely clear that you were deliberately interfering with your subordinates' attempts to carry out their duties.

"I am told that you yourself now realise that your words and actions on that day, could have been and were interpreted by Inspector McGill as undue pressure in an attempt to persuade Inspector McGill to take a certain course of action, albeit, as the Court heard in evidence, Inspector McGill was not swayed from his desire and intention to pursue the case."

Mr Curran said he accepted that Mr Morris's conduct was not motivated by malice, dishonesty, or for any financial gain, and was the action of a dedicated family man making a, "...woefully bad mistake in a misguided attempt to prevent facts of which he was well aware becoming the subject of official enquiries."

He added, "But that same fainily man was the chief officer who was the lawful superior of those charged with making such enquiries ... "

Mr Curran referred to the Falkland Islands as home to a, "small but remarkable community," with a need for trust in other members of the community. "Trust in those charged with official business in the Islands is therefore all the more important. Prosecutions of police officers and others concerned with the administration of justice are fortunately rare both in the United Kingdom and in other British jurisdictions.

"It is to be hoped that they will remain rare through the realisation that the slightest attempt at interference with the course of public justice, especially by one whose position is charged with an important part of its conduct, will have the direst consequences."

The effects of conviction upon Mr Morris have already been "dire", and in many ways he has punished himself by his fall from grace far more severely than any court could punish him. Mr Curran said.

said. "Your resignation from the Police Force recognised the inevitable consequence of conviction. With that disgrace and loss of status came also a considerable reduction in pension entitlement both by way of lump sum and annual income."

The prosecution made no application for costs.

Titterington returns to AG's Chambers

A FAMILIAR face will return to the Attorney General's Chambers later this month.

The Falkland Islands Government has announced that former Principal Crown Counsel Robert Titterington is to be appointed Acting Attorney General and will arrive in the Islands on February 23.

He will be employed on a secondment basis from the States of Guernsey for a period of four and a half months whilst the recruiting process is carried out to appoint a successor to Melanie Chilton, who left the Islands last month.

Mr Titterington is currently Crown Advocate in Guensey, Channel Islands and is well known in the Falklands, having served as Crown Counsel and then Principal Crown Counsel for 12 years before leaving in June 2000.

Chilton's resignation

An entry in the latest version of the government's *Gazette* has caused confusion.

In December, the resignation of former Attorney General, Melanie Chilton, was announced, "...for family health reasons." However, the *Gazette* listed her departure under 'Determination of Appointment', not 'Resignations'.

Penguin News contacted the Chief Executive to ascertain whether Mrs Chilton had resigned or been dismissed.

Chris Simpkins responded, "She was most definitely not dismissed," and added that the listing under "Determination" in the *Gazette* is "a little ambiguous" as, "...it is also correct to describe Melanie as having determined her contract (by notice)."

COUNCILLOR Clausen will not be alone in her disappointment and frustration at the turn the meeting of the 'smoking ban' working group took last week: have these people forgotten the overwhelming support for a ban revealed by the Health Census?

The working group, established after Legislative Council voted in favour of looking at the practical details of implementing a ban on smoking in public places, instead of following its remit, apparently seems to have rather conveniently focused on the complicated health and safety debate and the role for legislation. Ironic really, when the public seems united on the need for less red tape.

While the group (which comes under the most ridiculous name I ve ever heard) were agreed that smoking is a pretty horrid thing to do, talk turned away from the rather straightforward question of banning it in public places to legislating to make people stop - and even a move to illegalise tobacco altogether.

I'm not particularly pro or anti-ban, but this sort of talk makes me suspicious that they are trying to make the issue so complicated, eventually everyone will just give up on it.

If this is the case, they should reconsider. The census showed there are many in the community who want to be able to visit smoke-free pubs and clubs. Their views should not be disregarded.

THE sentencing of Dave Morris at last draws a line under what became far too long a saga.

Now, hopefully, all those affected by the charges which rocked the police force can move forward and get on with their lives.

Given the severity of the initial charges, some may feel Mr Morris has gotten off lightly but it is important to bear in mind both the length of time the case took to reach the courtroom and, of course, his unfortunate hospitalisation for many months.

In truth, his punishment will never really be over; this is a small community with a long memory and, although Mr Morris and his family can now move on in life, the events of the past two years will have left an indelible mark.

Dismay at shift of focus on smoking ban

COUNCILLOR Andrea Clausen has expressed dismay after a meeting was held to look at the banning of smoking in public places.

The Working Group on the Pos-sible Prohibition of Smoking in Public Places met late last week; it comprised Clirs Clausen and Summers, the Chief Medical Officer, Dr Roger Diggle, and representatives of pubs and the Chamber of Commerce

Cllr Clausen said she was, "shocked" to hear Dr Diggle say second hand smoke was not considered a threat to the health of individuals.

She was also upset at the way the group's focus had shifted. She said their objective was meant to be to look at the implementation

of a ban, however the other members had focused on the Health of the Nation as a whole instead

She commented, "They felt 16-24 year olds should be targeted, using legislation if necessary, such as upping the age for smoking.

They talked about taxes on tobacco - you would need a significant increase to have an effect - and incentives for employers to provide smoke-free conditions.

"(But) this is not what the working group was originally tasked to do." The public bar and Chamber of

Commerce representatives are now to consult their colleagues on the potential for introducing smoke-free incentives

The working group's next meeting will be held on March 19.

Court news Community service orders for youths 'Stressed' flasher fined

FOUR females, aged between 14 and 17 years old, were sentenced in the youth court on Thursday

Three of the females had previously pleaded guilty to a charge of burglary, while the other had entered pleas of guilty to two charges of burglary as well as charges of driving without a license or insurance.

Keith Watson, representing three of the youths, said that all have had difficult and insecure childhoods but that there was light at the end of the tunnel.

Mr Watson said that the youths have had the matter hanging over their heads since September which had been an element of punishment already and that the burglary had been opportunist rather than pre mediated

Stanley woman pleads guilty to drink driving

A PRESENTENCE report is to be prepared after Stanley woman Veronica Summers pleaded guilty to drink driving.

She was breathalysed by police on the afternoon of Wednesday, January 31, and provided a lower reading of 92mg of alcohol per 100ml of breath. The legal limit is 35mg

This is the second time Mrs Summers has been charged with drink driving. In 2004 she was disqualified from driving for eighteen months and fined £600 after she was found to have a level of 69mg of alcohol in her breath

The Senior Magistrate said she was concerned by the case, particularly given Mrs Summers' previous conviction, and ordered the preparation of a presentence report. The

agreed with Mr Watson that the incident had been opportunist and said that it was clear to her the youths had had a real fright and it had been a shock to them all. She said the incident will have put a dirty mark on their lives and that she hoped they wouldn't have to go through it again.

Two of the youths were each given a conditional discharge for a year whilst the oldest of the four youths received a community service order of fifty hours.

The youth who had pleaded guilty to the charges of burglary and to the driving offences received a community service order of sixtyfive hours.

All four were ordered to pay twenty pounds prosecution costs. FIRS

Also in court this week Christopher Hawksworth entered no plea to charges of resisting arrest and two counts of criminal damage to police property.

The case was adjourned until February 14 for his legal representative to take instructions.

Community service sentence Following a conviction three weeks ago for aiding and abetting the commission by Raul Hernandez of sexual touching without consent, Simon Ladrone De Guevara was given a 200 hour community service order to be undertaken over the next year.

Mr De Guevara was also ordered to pay £300 towards prosecution costs.

A MAN has been fined £1,420 after he pleaded guilty to three charges of exposing himself.

Crown Counsel Robert McMasters told the court that Vic-tor John Mahy (60) had twice exposed himself in a Stanley shop and once on a beach.

The first time the shopkeeper had noticed Mr Mahy exposing himself she had not reported it as she thought it might have been accidental, however on the second occasion she checked that his zip was closed as he entered the shop. He then exposed himself as he made his way to the make-up counter. The shop-keeper loudly announced for his benefit, that her friend who was a police officer was on her way to the shop and the man left. She then took note of his vehicle registration.

Mr McMasters said that when on the beach the man had watched a grandmother and her granchild through binoculars while exposing himself. The lady said she had been

traumatised by the event.

Defence lawyer Richard Marlor said the man's actions were out of character and were caused by stress from his work with the Salvation Army

Mr Marlor said he believes Mr Mahy was pressing the "self destruct button." that he couldn't think of any other way to get the Salvation Army to take notice. He said Mr Mahy was shocked at his actions and doesn't know why his stress manifested in this way. He apologised to the women involved.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds noted Mr Mahy's previous excellent character however she said it was not a single incident. She said he held a position of responsibility and was, a man who should have known better.

She fined him £350 for the first offence in the shop which she said was the least serious and £500 for each of the remaining offences, plus £70 costs

Lives lost in Punta Arenas hostel fire

TRAGEDY struck the southern city of Punta Arenas early on Saturday morning, when 10 tourists, including an entire family of Argentines, died inside the downtown youth hostel Blue House II.

In the early hours of the moming a fire broke out in the hostel with the blaze spreading so rapidly that just 30 minutes later the twostory structure partially collapsed. Six people escaped from the building by jumping out of windows. The hostel's other guests, however, are believed to have suffocated. Criminal charges have been filed against the owners as criminal accomplices to the fire as well as

homicide. Meanwhile in Valparaiso's historic Puerto neighbourhood, a gas leak caused a huge explosion on Saturday morning. The blast was so severe it downed power lines and blew out windows in a three-block radius. The explosion also resulted in a massive fire that consumed three buildings along Serrano Street. MF



Last week's court news

Extra cigarettes result in fines

TWO SEAMEN were fined in the Magistrate's Court last week after they submitted untrue declarations to a Customs Officer.

Peter Smythe (41) a Grade 1 Seaman on the fisheries patrol vessel Sigma and Andrew Balogh (53) Second Engineer from the Dorada both failed to declare the full quantity of duty free cigarettes and to-bacco they were carrying when they left the Falklands by the airbridge last year.

When Mr Smyth was leaving the Islands in July an RAF security officer informed a Customs officer that a scan of his hold luggage had shown three cartons of 200 cigarettes. When questioned Mr Smyth admitted to having four cartons which he had been saving up while on board Sigma. He was permitted to leave the Islands with the goods as his baggage had already been loaded.

Mr Smythe was fined £200 for the false declaration, £76.06 duty and £70 prosecution costs.

Mr Balogh was also fined £200 for making a false declaration and £70 costs but as the four cartons and five pouches of tobacco were retrieved from his luggage and impounded he was not required to pay duty

Youth trial: not guilty verdict The prosecution decided to offer no evidence at a trial scheduled

for a Youth Court. Counsel Crown Robert

McMasters said that it had been brought to his attention that the evidence leading to the charge of supplying alcohol to juveniles in a private place had been derived from transcribed interviews with the juveniles who were involved with other charges and there had been no statements taken.

He said that as the youngster had already pleaded guilty to a non-dwelling burglary and a driving offence, the Crown considered it was not in the public interest to proceed. Mr McMasters requested that a formal not guilty verdict be entered to which the Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds conceded.

The youth will reappear in court on February 8 for sentencing of the outstanding offences. (See above)

FOLLOWING extensive public consultation, the make up of Executive Council is likely to remain as it is, with three elected councillors serving.

"Members would just have to bear in mind when doing that that we don't necessarily want to change people around

In future, those who wish to stand for Executive Council will have the opportunity during Legislative Council - before the annual elections take place - to explain why they are right for the job.

Cilr Summers said he and his colleagues discussed how ExCo might be opened up to the public and this discussion will be brought into the report from the Select Committee. "We would like to have some more discussions with the Governor and the Foreign Office about it." he explained.

"We have an objective of having at least some part of ExCo open in the longer term

Members of the Select Committee were in support of keeping members of the public as lay members on committees and advisory groups. however they agreed there should be a more structured way of appointing those people. The Chief Executive is to produce a paper on how this might be done

"There were some fairly strong opinions; on balance the group feels it should not be obligatory at least in this testing phase but that we should leave some people free to say they prefer the allowance system and to get paid for the time put in, pro rata-ed (sic) to the full amount.

If this goes ahead, it will be implemented towards the end of the year, half way through this council's term, thus allowing two years to test the system.

As for how the level of pay should be set, Cllr Summers said there are two options open to members: "One is to try and see if it is possible to give a job description of the role of councillor to the group who do government wages and see if they can make something of it.

The other way is to ask the Chief Executive to convene a group of people, who are not councillors or public servants, but who have some knowledge of the democratic system here and how it works, to sit together and make some recommendations on what the pay might he

Further consultation on Education restructuring proposal

AT a meeting of the Education Board, which was attended by representatives from the Education Department, Director of Education Barbara Booth defended the way the staff restructuring proposal had been presented.

The proposal from the Director was prompted by a suggestion from councillors that on taking up her post she could take a fresh look at some issues that were causing concern. Mrs Booth said the restructuring proposal was written to highlight issues and was not intended to detract from the fact that the staff are hard-working. She said a coordinated launch was intended to ensure that everyone received the same information at the same time

Representatives from FICS and the Infant and Junior School commented that the documents put to the last Executive Council meeting had not contained any of the positive aspects of their work and had focused on negatives.

Camp Education Manager Richard Fogerty, questioned wether there had been any other proposals or options offered at the time the restructuring was put forward describing it as a "drastic" approach.

He said that he would have appreciated seeing at least the part of the report pertaining to Camp Education and to have been given a chance to respond.

Councillor Janet Robertson said that the proposal had been put into the public and staff arena as a model to see how it could be "shaken up" and something suitable worked from it. She added that no alternative proposal has been presented as far as she is aware. She reassured Mr Fogerty that she was 100% certain there was "no will to see Camp Education diminished in any way." adding "it is a very im-portant part of the system."

There is only one significant area of the proposal that is not now supported in principle by the majority of the Education Department: the new position of an Executive Head Teacher has caused consternation among members of the department who feel that without full details of that and other posts they cannot see how the restructuring will fit together. The point that it is a "top heavy strucfor a small department was ture." made by representatives from both schools and the Training Centre.

Prior to the proposal being put forward Mrs Booth spent a day shadowing Year 8 pupils; she indicated that there were development areas which needed to be addressed. The Director had also been informed confidentially that staff morale was low and that it was,

"not a happy school."

FICS teacher Louise Taylor said the feeling in the staff room was that many of the issues that prompted the restructuring proposal could have been worked on if they had been communicated to staff at an earlier date.

Following the consultation period the restructuring is scheduled to be implemented in September. 2007. Leisure Centre Manager Steve Dent stressed the need to. "...get a grip and move things along," with working groups.

Mrs Booth is to have a meeting with heads of units when a schedule will be put together and a working group formed to look at the position of Executive Head Teacher and the duties of that and other posts in an effort to promote further discussion.

Lunchtime provision

A survey conducted by the Infant and Junior School Parents' Association to investigate the level of support for a supervised lunchtime has revealed that the majority would like to see something in place.

36% indicated they would be regular users of a service with an additional 28% saying they would be occasional users. 76% indicated they would be willing to pay for the service and 75% are willing to provide a packed lunch: 63% showed interest in prepaid com-

mercial lunch provision while 77% wanted the length of the lunchtime to remain the same.

Board Member Natalie Smith questioned whether it was an education or private sector responsibility, suggesting that expressions of interest should be sought.

Mrs Booth said it would not be leaching staff supervising the children at lunchtime as they needed a break as well. She is to discuss the issue further with Infant and Junior School Head Teacher Nick Barrett.

Cllr Robertson noted that the nurseries in Stanley should be given the results of the questionnaire as it could affect them positively, if they are aware of what parents needs are, or negatively if they were to lose some of their lunchtime business

Higher Education

The Director of Education has commended Daniel Biggs for the high standards he has achieved in his degree studies.

In the eight required modules of the final year of study Daniel attained one high distinction pass and four distinction passes. Daniel has therefore succesfully com-pleted his Bachelor of Science (Sport and Exercise Science) at the University of the Sunshine Coast, Queensland, Australia.



Plan proposed to protect rare plants

THE Environmental Planning Department wants the public's views on the conservation of a sensitive plant area near Stanley airport.

The Yorke Bay pond is a key site for three protected plant species: Spider plant, Dusen's moonwort and White orchid.

The Environmental Planning Department is proposing to construct a fence line/boulder system around the pond to discourage people from driving vehicles near the pond.

Access by pedestrians and horses to the pond - and to the nearby sand collection point and Penguin Walk - will not be restricted.

The move is part of an overall improvement to the management and use of the whole Cape Pembroke. Yorke Bay, Gypsy Cove and Surf Bay area.

Along with the pond, priority has been given to Gypsy Cove where moves have already been taken to conserve the site, and Cape Pembroke, for which a management plan is soon to be developed.

At a meeting of the Environmental Committee held on Monday, Councillor Richard Davies volunteered to speak to the Lands Committee about identifying a place specifically for drivers to be able to dirt-track

Also at the meeting, the Committee agreed consultation on applications for licences to fish in shallow marine areas should be widened.

Responding to a paper prepared by the Director of Fisheries on the grounding of the trawler Holberg in November 2006, the group recommended that consultation should be held not only with the Fisheries Committee but other agencies before licences are granted. The Holberg grounded in Port Purvis, mid way through its second trawl for scallops.

This recommendation is to be included in a paper which will be presented to the next Environmental Committee meeting, in April. and will then be referred to Executive Council.

The paper may also address legislation regarding fuel spills - including the redefinition of what is classed as a persistent pollutant.

At the meeting of the Environmental Committee, Director of Falklands Conservation. Grant Munro suggested that divers visit Port Purvis to examine the impact the Holberg's first trawl made on the area.

He said this information could prove useful when future applications to trawl in shallow marine areas are being considered.

. A draft management plan for the Yorke Bay pond area has been published and is available from the Environmental Planning Department.

January's weather - 'below average'

JANUARY was a month of below average temperatures. rainfall and sunshine.

The mean maximum temperature was 13.9C. 1.3 degrees below the long term of 15.2C. The highest temperature recorded was 19.3C on the 9th and the lowest maximum was 7.9C on the 18th.

The mean minimum temperature was 6.3C, slightly below the long term average of 6.5C. The lowest minimum was 2.2C on the 20th and the highest minimum of 10.5C was recorded on the 8th

It was a below average month for rainfall, with a total of 55.2mm. against the January norm of 62.8mm. The wettest day was the 1" with 7.9mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 18 days and 1.0mm or more on 11 days.

There was one day when snow or sleet fell and six days when hail was reported. There were no days of thunder and five days with fog.

There were 218.0 hours of sunshine, slightly less than the aver-age of 227.8 hours. The highest daily total was 14.8 hours on the 21°

The monthly mean wind speed was 15.6 knots, average for January. The highest hourly mean speed of 38 knots and the highest gust of 52 knots, both occurred on the 11th

There were 17 days with gusts over 33 knots, which is below the average for the month. Gales were recorded on six days, above average for the month.

Bill's frustration grows

FORGIVE me for returning to my old pet hate, but Cable and Wireless continue to excel themselves in providing what seems to me to be the lowest possible level of service to the people of these Islands.

In Stanley now, if you want to get on to broadband you can only have the lowest level available; why is this? Because they don't have sufficient capacity as has always been the case. The familiar story of the service getting slower and slower until it is almost unusable - then they add a bit more!

Now we have another visit from our government advisor - Mr Doyle - and the day before he arrives Cable and Wireless announces a so called "concession" to heavy users of the internet in Camp

Some concession! What it means is that you get an effectively unlimited connection to the internet that will cost you £150. Yes, one hundred and fifty pounds! This is for a crawlingly slow link that won't even download the Penguin News most of the time.

What a coincidence too - they knew that people like me would be bending Mr Doyle's ear to force them to comply with their promise ages ago that when broadband was available in Stanley, there would be charging system for camp subscribers that would provide some degree of equality. It doesn't sound very equitable to me.

Many people have looked at al-ternatives and they are available. I believe I could install a system here for about £1.500 and then have 'always on' internet connection and phones for about £100 a month.

Now we hear that Cable and Wireless are going to try to make such systems illegal. This is preposterous and I hope councillors will not have any truck with such a suggestion! If Cable and Wireless can'V won't provide a service then the individual should be free to do it himself.

This reminds me of Cable and Wireless's attitude when they first started - they wanted to ban two metre sets because it would cost them revenue. I hope this council will give them as robust an answer as that one then did.

It is time the government took a long hard look at this situation. There are alternatives available and it might be a salutary lesson for Cable and Wireless if they had their backside kicked out of here. There might be a period when communications were disrupted but in the long run it would be worth it to get a modern system rather than being ten years behind the rest of the world.

Oh, by the way, don't bother writing to the new General Manager - I did almost three weeks ago and have not even had the courtesy of an acknowledgement. **Bill Luxton** Chartres

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
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Dr Chris Doyle: back to monitor telecoms progress

TELECOMMUNICATIONS consultant, Dr Chris Doyle was in the Islands last week on his third visit, at the invitation of the government to look at the provision of telecommunications by Cable and Wireless.

Progress with broadband and mobile communications has been made since his last visit some 18 months ago and Dr Doyle was happy to be able to contact his family using a video web cam link.

However, there are a number of key decisions to be made with regard to communications not least the issue of a new license, a process which is likely to happen within the next five years when Cable and Wireless' existing licence will have expired.

The Camp telephone system is still a pressing issue: when Dr Doyle visited in 2004 his main purpose was to assess the proposals on the table for replacing the Camp radio-based system. As a result of Cable and Wireless's investment in the new switch, mobile phones and broadband, the size of the Camp system has been reduced - Mount Pleasant has been brought onto the main network and the life of the residual Camp network has been extended by approximately two years.

The position now however, is that no one manufactures the equipment any more, spares are difficult to obtain and it is expected that almost certainly by the end of this year the system will become inoperative.

At the same time BFBS are about to convert their television service to a more advanced digital transmission and as a result of that the TV signal that is currently beamed around the Islands will not reach beyond MPA and Stanley.

Dr Doyle said the whole question of how Camp is supplied with communications is a matter of some urgency but he noticed during his talks with councillors and others involved that there has not been a complete awareness of how soon this will all happen: as a result the issue has been pushed up the agenda in terms of importance.

The Camp system could well, "leap ahead," in the near future said Dr Doyle. "The proposals on the table to replace the current Camp radio system vary in cost terms across the board from £4.5 million for one system. Government is very cautious about contributing to any scheme that involves very large numbers like that.

'I think what we are looking at is a VSAT (very small aperture terminal) system in Camp - each area would have a small dish which would communicate directly with a satellite and from that dish the signal would be distributed locally either with wires or wireless to various residences. That sort of service can provide a very capable and reasonably fast internet access, maybe even faster than the basic package offered on the Cable and Wireless one. There is every prospect I think that in the next two years that Camp will have much better internet access.

Telephone, radio and television are not likely to be combined under one system, he said. "TV is very bandwidth-hungry, but no decision has been made as yet. We are still look-

ing at different options, but I would be surprised if a package with every thing bundled together was considcred.

Dr Doyle said the new telecommunications system is needed very soon so three separate systems will more likely be required. With BFBS going digital this would mean that each house will need a dish to receive the signal.

Stanley-based company KTV has put forward its own proposals for Camp which include a form of integrated telephony and internet and TV as a package which is being considered by the government. "The implications for the tax payer need to be considered as they would pay to-wards to this," Dr Doyle said.

Special offers

Cable and Wireless recently introduced an offer to Camp internet customers of 0.025p per minute after exceeding £150, Dr Doyle said there has been some confusion with the advertising which was not particularly clear.

He said there was no pressure on Cable and Wireless from government to make this offer, adding, * . it is a coincidence that it came out just before I arrived, but there is a new CEO at Cable and Wireless, perhaps it is one of his initiatives.

Although the £150 mark may seem like a lot, Dr Doyle said that on his previous visits to Camp he was amazed at how much was spent on communications and he felt many people would benefit from the offer.

Meetings have been held with the government Chief Executive and councillors and an apparent lack of transparency in the Cable and Wireless operation, particularly financial data, has been flagged up as a concern

"Government feels it cannot effectively regulate the company, can't protect the public adequately because it does not have the relevant information to do that job.

I have strongly encouraged the government to exercise what powers they have within the law to request more information so they can do a better job protecting the customers and make sure the monopoly does not abuse its position."

Self-supply

Dr Doyle has been consulted on a legal issue involving at least one Islander supplying their own internet access. He said he understands the motivation behind self-provision and it raises questions about what would happen if many people were to do "It's interesting and quite hard this. to deal with as, on the one hand, you can argue that important businesses should be allowed the option to selfprovide if they can demonstrate they have a much better service by so doing and, as a consequence of that, it has spill over benefits to the rest of the economy.

Dr Doyle said that generally peo-ple only self-provide if it is cheaper and better. "I think it is probably better and pound for pound for data transported it is probably cheaper. This begs the question, why don't Cable and Wireless offer it if it is cheaper

A need to cover the high cost of replacing the Cable and Wireless Earth Station in 2003/4 could be the motivation for not offering VSAT

services, Dr Doyle said. "Therefore they are financially motivated to not offer the service even though it is proven reliable technology for remote areas.

VSATs are also used for ATMs explained Dr Doyle; the bank here could have a VSAT on the roof, communicating with the Standard Chartered network, allowing an ATM to be installed. "I would have thought that is something that needs attention ... it gives flexibility to the population as well as visitors," he said. Value for money?

So is the average customer getting a good deal on broadband?

Dr Doyle said comparisons can't be made with the UK as there are so few users here. "It depends on how well the company is being run and how best they are serving the community; we need more information about the company before we can form a judgement. To date government has been kept in the dark as to how well run or how profitable it has been, which is odd

It is to be expected that prices here are higher than elsewhere, he said; the question is how they compare with other remote areas, adding that prices in Ascension are a lot higher

He commented, "I don't want to say that it is a rough deal as when we look at the figures properly it could well be the case that Cable and Wireless are doing a good job. "They should be a bit more open: by not providing information peo-

ple form negative opinions. As for mobile charges, Dr Doyle said these are not so high on the agenda which suggests that people

are not so worried about them. He referred to the Touch Premium deals of 80p per minute as "competitive" with the land line tariff although some people have complained about the quality of the mobile service.

Dr Doyle said he is happier with what is going on generally in terms of service provision, but added, ...this doesn't mean the service level is what it should be, just better than what it was. In terms of my former recommendations, not enough have been acted on yet.

However, some of this is because government chose to defer actions in view of the fact that Cable and Wireless were undertaking investments in switch, broadband and mobile and they thought it was more important to get those things in than to deal with other issues.

He said some earlier recommendations are being dealt with now and will be repeated in his next report.

'I sense on this occasion that there is more determination from government and the new council to deal with issues; it is very refreshing.'


Day 5 - Friday, December 8 (Battle Day)

Shona started walking with us, but took the right decision to sit out the rest of the day early on, as her blisters were playing up

Lunch was spent at Douglas Station turn-off, time for some light entertainment from Shona "Sheila" Strange, teaching her slang from diflerent countries. Yet again the sun was up, Steve kept piling on the Factor 30, and looked as though he had seen a ghost, was that white.

However the sun zapped me, affecting my left hand which swelled up giving me a little cause for concern. Shona and Ernie bandage this up, while Steve - his First Aid training behind him - looked on in amusement

We made it to the area of Chatta House for 2.30pm, the end of this leg. We can see the Malo Hills. Mount Kent and Two


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we were like an old married couple; my reply was that I would have divorced him by now.

As soon as they enter the world at birth, babies are suddenly exposed to daily contact with many different bacteria and viruses.

For the first three months of life, babies are protected to a large extent from infection by the immunity acquired from their mothers before birth. If they are breastfed, babies will continue to receive some protection from their mother's milk until they are weaned. After this the risk of infection increases and babies may begin to suffer from common allments such as coughs and colds.

Although many of these infections clear up quickly, causing no long term effects, illness in babies and young children can be very worrying and upsetting for parents.

Once children begin to mix with others at places such as childminders and nursery, they will pick up infections easily. Fortunately, most coughs and colds last only a few days, and will often clear up without treatment.

Colds

A runny nose is usually the first sign that a cold is beginning. Your child's appetite may reduce and he may be generally 'out of sorts'. Frequent sneezing, along with other symptoms can be a common sign in young babies who cannot blow their noses to ease nasal congestion. A baby or child can catch as many as 6 or 8 colds in one year! They often last for about a week and are caused by a virus so antibiotics will not help. Immunity increases as your child matures.

There are a few points to remember that will help your child feel more comfortable during the infection.

Make sure your child has plenty to drink at regular intervals. Don't worry if they refuse to eat; their appetite soon recovers and they make up for lost time!

Don't keep your child in bed, allow him to run around if he feels like it.

If your baby's blocked nose prevents him from sucking properly from the breast or bottle saline nose drops may help moisten the secretions in the nose. These can be obtained from the KEMH Pharmacy.

In babies, tickling the end of the nose with a teased out cotton bud will often help the baby to sneeze, thereby clearing the nose and making it easier for the baby to breathe when feeding.

Giving a baby a pillow is not a good idea, but placing a soft pillow under the head end of the mattress so that the baby's head is slightly raised should help a snuffly baby breathe more easily. • Avoid having your baby or child in a smoky atmosphere. Smoke causes coughs and can make the cough worse and sometimes leads on to more severe illnesses.

Coughs

A cough is the body's natural reaction to an irritation of the throat, the back of the nose or the lining of the air passages. Coughs tend to fall into two types: chesty coughs or dry coughs.

The dry cough is irritating and 'ticklish', usually upsetting to listen to and often wakes the child and parents at night. These are often caused by a virus and again, antibiotics will not have any effect on this type of cough. Children and babies with a dry cough may still have an appetite and drink normally, smile and will not necessarily have a high temperature. However if the cough is persistent and worse at night or is accompanied by wheezing, your child will need to see a doctor for a medical opinion. A child with a hoarse cough with noisy breathing should also be seen by a doc-LOF

The chesty coughs often sound harsh and wet: they help to clear infection from the lungs. These coughs are often caused by mucus trickling down the back of the throat. Bacterial infections usually cause a chesty cough and these are frequently accompanied by a high temperature of 38 C or more, breathlessness and a loss of appetite. These children can be uncomfortable when lying flat. With these symptoms it would be necessary to have your child checked by a doctor who may prescribe antibiotics.

Cough medicines are not available for young babies and the effectiveness of cough syrups for children is disputed. To ease a cough, sometimes it may be enough to offer the baby and very young child small amounts of cool boiled water. For older children a cool drink of clear fluids such as water, weak juice or <u>crushed</u>, slightly softened ice cubes to suck on or a small warm drink of lemon and honey can help ease a tickly cough.

Do not give cough sweets or lozenges to children under three years of age as they may choke if these become sluck in their throat.

If at any time you feel that your child is having trouble breathing then you must seek medical help as soon as possible.

Small babies are not good at controlling their own temperature.

It's important that adults safeguard them from getting too hot. Overheating can cause febrile convulsions (fits caused by a temperature that is too high and most common

in the under threes) and can be a factor in cot deaths. Tak. A high temperature is not unusual with coughs and colds and is one of the body's natural ways of killing germs. Left to run its course, a fever culminates in the germs being destroyed by their own toxins. At this point, the purpose of the fever has been served and the temperature normalises as the fever subsides. If you have a thermometer it is helpful to take your baby's or child's temperature so that if you need to speak to a doctor you can pass on this information. Digital or heat sensitive strips for the forehead or digital ear thermometers are now recommended for use in the young.

Reducing a Fever

A high temperature is regarded as being over 38 degrees C. There are some basic steps to take to reduce a temperature before contacting the doctor or giving medication:

Reduce the number of clothes on your child. Undress them to their vest and nappy or their vest and pants. If they are in bed or in their cot, reduce the amount of bedding down to perhaps just one sheet covering them.

• Offer them plenty of cool clear fluids.

Reduce the temperature of the room. Turn off radiators or open a window to allow cool air into the room.

Try not to cuddle hot children for too long as your body temperature will add to theirs.

Paediatric paracetamol and/or ibuprofen can be given and they work by reducing any pain or inflammation and most importantly they can help reduce the body temperature. Check the label on the brand that you have purchased for instructions on how much and how often it should be given.

Medinol (paediatric paracetamol) for three months of age and older can be purchased from the Pharmacy at KEMH for $\pounds 1$ per bottle and lbuprofen for six months and over can also be purchased at the Pharmacy for $\pounds 2.35$ a bottle.

Wool market report for week ending February 2 By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices stabilised at sales in New Zealand. South Africa and Australia last week compared to their "rollercoaster ride" of the last few weeks.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, prices for fleece wool lots generally eased by a few pence per kilogram clean at the fine and broad end of the micron spectrum, but gained a few pence for lots between 22 and 24 micron.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week relatively unchanged at 368.0 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 367.5 pence per kilogram clean.

According to industry analysts, concern over greasy wool supply combined with improved downstream processing and spinning demand are expected to remain as important market drivers over the coming few months.

It is worthy of note that South African fine wool lots continue to trade at discounts to Australian markets while mid-micron lots continue to trade at significant premiums to Australian auction floor prices.

In South Africa 96% of the 4,504 bales available were sold.

Standard Wool and G Modiano were once again very active in the market. In Australia only 92% of the 81,448 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 8.849 bales of crossbred wool of which 94% was sold.

Next week approximately 94,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia. Note:





Port facilities back on the agenda: consultants enlisted

EVERYONE with an interest in the development of port facilities in the Falkland Islands is being encouraged to take part in planning their growth.

The Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) this week appointed port experts Royal Haskoning to create a port development plan, and input from everyone with an interest in the port will be a key part of their work.

A spokesperson for FIDC commented, "The plan will draw together the diverse needs of everyone using port facilities in the Falkland Islands to identify the best way forward at an exciting time: issues currently facing the port include the growth of containerised traffic, the continued increase in cruise ship visits, and the potential for further hydrocarbons exploration."

The plan is the next step in the long-term development of port facilities in the Falklands. In 2005, the government considered the creation of a deep-water port at a new site, but decided that, largely due to financial constraints, port development should continue to be focused at the FIPASS site for the foreseeable future (though not necessarily with the existing facilities).

Royal Haskoning have therefore been tasked to create a plan for the growth and improvement of facilities at this site. According to FIDC, their work will tackle issues including:

The growth of containerised shipping and need for improved container handling facilities.

Anticipated growth in the fisheries sector stimulated by the new, property-based rights fishery introduced by FIG.

· Potential hydrocarbons exploration.

Continued growth in cruise ship visits.

Potential growth of an aquaculture industry.

Infrastructure development.

Future management options, including the potential for publicprivate partnerships.

Royal Haskoning were chosen to carry out the work by an FIDC tender board, which considered five proposals submitted by both local and international companies. Tender board member Tim Cotter said, "The board was unanimous that Royal Haskoning's exceptional expertise in this area made them the obvious choice.

"Their proposal tackled all of the issues raised in the tender documents, and their team have a great deal of experience in carrying out this type of work - the company carries out about 250 studies of this nature each year. We very much look forward to working with them."

Two staff from Royal Haskoning's UK offices will visit the Falklands to see the site for themselves and meet with everyone who has an interest in the port.

The exact date for their visit is to be confirmed, but FIDC aims to contact all those who might want to meet the team ahead of their arrival. It looked for all the world as though John Cleese had turned up with a huge cast from the Ministry of Funny Walks.

The tears didn't quite materialise but I felt really sorry for the tourist operators and drivers who were visibly cringing and muttering, "Christ, it's embarrassing."

Give them their due though, the big welcoming smiles never faltered and the sound of, "welcome to the Falklands, sir, mind the puddles.... I'm so sorry about the weather," continued to ring around the clay patch - erm sorry, car park.

I didn't hear them saying, "Welcome to the Falklands, I'm so sorry about my government's inconsideration for your comfort during your visit," but they would have been quite justified in doing so. They continued to be good ambassadors for their country, trying to make these people who contibute greatly to the economy enjoy a day in Stanley. In case anyone could have possibly forgotten it is the 25th anniversay

In case anyone could have possibly forgotten it is the 25th anniversay year, a time when we are all being encouraged to demonstrate how the Islands have moved on, grown and prospered since the war with Argentina. Concerns were voiced at a public meeting last year by a member of the 2007 Committe that "extra curricular" activities in the pubs over the June 14/15 commemorations could result in a bad image of the Falklands being projected. Duo to work on Falkland Diaries



WELSH writer Desmond Barry and photographer Diego Vidart have travelled from Cardiff to the Falkland Islands to undertake a documentary project called *The Falkland Diaries*.

Des and Diego arrived on Wednesday for a three week visit during which they intend to create two pieces of work in the form of diaries, one visual and one written of their experience in the Islands to be exhibited in the Wales Millennium Centre through May and June.

The focus of the documentary project will be on people and place, landscape and psychology, both the Islanders' and their own reactions to the place in the present and the past: Des's as a British citizen and Diego's as a South American, through word and image.

They will offer Falkland Islanders the opportunity to add their own voices to the project through relaxed Writing Workshops to create an environment for digital dialogue that can become part of the interactive exhibition.

The men say that the collaboration itself symbolises that cooperation is possible by people of diverse backgrounds who now share the experience of living in Cardiff, and a global vision of twenty-first century living as well as the people of the Islands themselves.

Operation Tabarin captain dies

CAPTAIN Victor Marchesi, who has died aged 92, was an unsung hero of Operation Tabarin, which secretly safeguarded British interests in the Antarctic during the Second World War.

He joined Naval Party 497, under the command of Lieutenant-Commander Jimmy Marr; the fourteen strong team left the Falkland Islands in two ships, HMS William Scoresby (a minesweeping trawler) and Fitzroy, on Saturday January 29, 1944 to spend three seasons challenging Argentina's territorial claims and preventing German Uboats from establishing bases in the South Atlantic.

Mr Marchesi established a base on Deception Island, in the South Shetlands. He found cylinders containing Argentine claims to sovereignty, which had been left two years earlier by an Argentine patrol ship, and removed them along with others on the Melchior Islands and the Antarctic peninsula. Although ice initially prevented a landing at Hope Bay, Marchesi carried out geology, biology and survey programmes in the South Orkneys and South Georgia.

In February 1945 a five-man base at Hope Bay on Deception Island, with the Union Flag in place of the Argentines', and an eightman base at Wiencke Island, off Graham Land, were established. Both bases operated post offices and when more were founded by the British, with Canadian help, all were resupplied by Mr Marchesi.

During this time he wrote several hundred letters to diplomats around the world in furtherance of British claims of sovereignty, though Argentina refused to deliver to embassies in Buenos Aires.

Churchill, who had not been consulted about Operation Tabarin, was concerned that it would upset the United States, whose postwar policy towards Antarctica was uncertain. But he did not prevent the Falkland Islands Dependencies government being set up or the issue of Falkland Islands postage stamps overprinted with "British Antarctic Territories" and "South Sandwich Islands."

After the war responsibility for Tabarin shifted from the Admiralty to the Colonial Office before being finally taken over by the British Antarctic Survey.

In 2005 Mr Marchesi recounted the story of Operation Tabarin for the BBC, and his exploits were commemorated in a £1 stamp issued by the Falkland Islands in the same year. He missed by a few months the length of service necessary for the award of the Bronze Polar Medal. Telegraph

Intrepid to be 'recycled' this year

Japanese whaling ship catches fire

A JAPANESE whaling ship has caught fire near Antarctica, leaving one crew member missing and raising fears of environmental damage.

The blaze on board the Nisshin Maru prompted the evacuation of its crew onto other ships. The whaling fleet has been pursued by activists, protesting at their plans to hunt 850 minke whales and ten fin whales.

About 120 members the Nisshin Maru crew were evacuated to three other ships in the whaling fleet, while 40 sailors stayed on board to fight the fire in the ship's engine room.

One crew member is reported missing, but it is not clear whether he was caught up in the flames or went overboard into the icy waters of the Ross Sea.

New Zealand Conservation Minister, Chris Carter said that while the safety of the whaling ship's crew was the top priority. "we are also gravely concerned about the environmental risk to Antarctica's pristine environment, if the ship is sufficiently damaged to begin leaking oil."

In recent days, protesters from the Sea Shepherd environmental group have clashed with the whalers, and thrown acid and other objects on to the ships to try to stop them from carrying out their hunt.

New Zealand maritime authorities have ruled out any possibility that anti-whaling protestors had anything to do with the fire. Instead they think the blaze was caused by a mechanical fault. Earlier this week, Japanese fisheries officials described members of the Sea Shepherd group as terrorists, after one of their vessels collided with a whaling boat in the Southern Ocean.

After that incident activists threatened to ram the Nisshin Maru to prevent whales being hauled on board for processing, however the activists' ships were at least two or three days' sailing distance away from the whalers when the fire occurred. MP

Court news

Pub squabble spills out into the street

A TOTAL of three men have now been fined after a squabble in Deano's spilled out onto the street.

Following a day long trial, Stanley man Scott Henry-Roberts has been found guilty of common assault and fined £100 with £250 costs.

Mr Roberts was in Deano's Bar on October 7, when a fracas broke out near the pool table after Richard Bonner grabbed Mr Roberts by the throat. Giving evidence on Tuesday Mr Bonner said he had done this because Mr Roberts had told him he had "got off" with his girlfriend at a party and had been "gleeful" about it. Mr Roberts however said the first he knew of Mr Bonner being in the bar was when he was grabbed by the throat.

Mr Roberts' uncle, John Henry, came to his aid and punched Mr Bonner 2-3 times in the chest and stomach area. This incident resulted in charges of common assault against both Mr Bonner and Mr Henry.

Richard Bonner pleaded guilty to common assault and was fined £175 plus costs in December. Mr Henry also entered a guilty plea, however sentencing was deferred until after the trial.

Mr Bonner was evicted from the pub after this incident; Mr Roberts and Mr Henry left some five minutes later of their own accord.

Deano's landlord Kevin Connolly giving evidence said he had gone to the door of the pub and seen Mr Bonner run from the east side of the building towards Mr Henry and that both men fell into the middle of the road grappling. He said Mr Henry's friends ran over to them, that everything happened very fast and he saw some kicks going into Mr Bonner. Mr Connolly said he yelled "stop" and the group immediately walked off. He added, "...it was out of character for all the lads involved."

Mr Bonner was transported to hospital in a taxi where he had stitches to a cut on his head and needed crutches to assist with walking. Some of the bruising to his body was described by Dr Diggle as, "consistent with the heel of a boot but, could have been caused by any number of reasons."

Crown Prosecution Robert McMasters made an application to the court, which was granted, for permission to treat witness Violet Stevens as hostile when it became clear she was initially withholding evidence. He was then able to put statements from her police interview to her.

Miss Stevens agreed she had seen Mr Roberts kick Mr Bonner, "at least once."

However in cross examination by defence lawyer Keith Watson Miss Stevens said she, "could not be sure at all," that the kicking motion she had seen had made contact with anyone.

Giving evidence and in cross examination Mr Roberts denied categorically having kicked Mr Bonner.

In mitigation Mr Watson said he did not consider it possible to conclude beyond all reasonable doubt that Mr Roberts had kicked Mr Bonner with none of the three prosecution witnesses able to say for sure that they had seen contact between the two men. He said there had been apologies and handshakes all round in the cool calm light of day, however, "...officialdom had come on the scene and they had ended up in court."

In making a conviction Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said she was satisfied there had been physical contact of an unreasonable manner, when Mr Bonner was on the road. Mr Henry had dealt with the situation you could have removed yourself, she told Mr Roberts, adding, that she was not holding him responsible for the injuries to Mr Bonner. She said it was a minor assault as was that of Mr Henry who had admitted to punching Mr Bonner when he ran at him.

Mr Henry was fined £100 plus £70 costs.

PSRs for two men facing possible custody

PRESENTENCE reports are to be prepared for two men who face possible custodial sentences.

Christopher Hawksworth (30) entered pleas of guilty to one charge of resisting arrest and two of criminal damage.

Crown Counsel Robert McMasters said that on January I, an anonymous call was received from Mr Hawksworth's mobile asking for assistance at the Victory Bar.

Mr Hawksworth was outside the pub when a patrol arrived and he told them, "I like you, this is nothing personal but you are going to get it." He proceeded to punch the passenger side wing mirror until it fell off and was arrested and cautioned. He was compliant until the handcuffs were placed on him and another officer was called.

Once in the custody area at the police station he headbutted the reinforced glass in the door several times until it broke.

In a police interview Mr Hawksworth made a full admission, adding that he wanted to be arrested so he could see his brother who was in custody at the time

The case was adjourned until March 28, for a presentence report to be prepared.

Toby Poole (22) pleaded guilty to charges of taking a vehicle without consent and driving when disqualified and without insurance

Mr McMasters said that on December 29, Mr Poole travelled to Mount Pleasant with Miss Collier and Miss Daly to visit Ian Jordan in Paul Phillips' Shogun. Miss Daly had permission to use the vehicle for work related purposes and was driving.

After playing bowls and having some drinks they decided that Mr Poole should drive on the return journey, to protect Miss Dalys' licence. Military Police noticed the vehicle being driven in the middle of and on the wrong side of the road and stopped it.

Mr Poole will also reappear in court on March 28, following the preparation of a presentence report

Dockyard working group to be formed: Planning and Building news

WITH almost double the number of new applications than last month, the committee had a busy agenda to follow.

The meeting was chaired as usual by ClIr Richard Davies: ClIr Mike Rendell also attended as did other members Iain Berntsen, Gerald Cheek, Les Harris and Graham Middleton.

The meeting opened with words of welcome from councillor Davies to the new Environmental Planning Officer. Andrea Wright, who has just arrived in the Islands.

Following confirmation of the minutes of the last meeting, the committee looked at matters arising and were informed that Executive Council (ExCo) had approved their recommendations with regard to TV and radio aerials, for which the necessary legislation was currently being drafted. ExCo had also approved the Dockyard Development Brief with a recommendation that a working group be formed to guide its implementation.

It was reported that five people had put their names forward to be considered for the vacant position as a Lay Member. These were to be reviewed in part two (the closed session) of the meeting and the person chosen by the committee would then have their name referred to ExCo for endorsement.

Of three applications deferred at previous meetings, two had a similar decision given due to further information needed and the third, the construction of a hatchery demonstration unit on government land at Moody Brook was expected to be withdrawn, the applicant (Brendan Gara) having submitted an alternative proposal, to convert an existing agricultural operation to a demonstration site for freshwater and marine aquaculture at Grandad's Gardens, Moody Valley, for which the committee gave their approval.

New applications

The first of the thirteen new applications to be reviewed was for the permanent consent to the siting of the Portakabin with a monopitched roof used as a retail shop known as "Sew What" at 5 Jersey Road for Tansy Newman, Such consent was granted, and conditional planning permission given to the following detailed proposals: the erection of a one-and-a-half storey office and store on land at 2Brandon Road West for Sally Poncet this followed outline consent granted earlier and is to be used as ancillary to the main dwelling on the site; a conservatory at 2 Racecourse Road East for Dilly Payne: the erection by the Public Works Department of a monument to MV Atlantic Conveyor at Cape Pembroke; Dick Sawle's proposal to install a lift pump for sewage and replace the existing outfall to his property at Seaview Cottage on Ross Road East: the alterations to the existing access to improve offstreet parking at 3a Brisbane Road for Basil Faria; and the erection of a new garage to replace the existing so as to improve access visibility to Callaghan Road at his property at 84 Davis Street for Tony Jaffray.

There were also a number of applications seeking permission in principle for development and the following received such consent subject to the standard outline planning conditions, the proposal to split the land at 14 Hansen Hill into two building plots by Daniel Biggs; the erection of a dwelling on land to the rear of 3 Brandon Road but with access off that road for Evan Jones; Roy Buckett's proposal to split the property at 1 Davis Street East into two housing plots with the removal of the existing dwelling on that site; and the erection of two dwellings on land at 12 Dairy Pad-dock Road south of his existing house by Keith Dickson.

Just one "new" application was deferred, that of the siting of a Portakabin for storage at 3 Brandon Road West for Peter McKay. The earlier consent had now expired and members wished to know the intentions for its future use before granting any extension.

Alan Dawson, the Building Adviser, then moved on to present a brief report on applications he had reviewed for building permits, advising members that he still awaited further details on some before issuing such notice of approval to proceed with work.

The committee were then informed by the secretary, Fiona Wallace-Nannig, that no applications for off-street parking grants had been received since the last meeting, and the "open" session concluded. The next meeting will be held on Thursday. March 8, at 8.30am in the Liberation Room at the Secretariat.





Priest's appeal to new Bishop: 'reinstate the Mother Church of Anglicanism in Sth America'

THE following is an open letter to the new Bishop of the Falkland Islands.

THE recent announcement in the press of your appointment as Bishop of the Falkland Islands, in addition to being Bishop in Canterbury, came a fortnight after the publication of Terry Peck's obituary in the Daily Telegraph (January 6).

It stated in his obituary that after being taken hostage in 1966 by the armed hi-jackers of an Argentine airliner, "he eventually escaped in the cloak of an Anglican priest, who was acting as a go-between. before the Argentines surrendered." I was that Anglican priest of Falkland Islands descent, born and educated here in England, but whose maternal grandparents were pioneer settlers in the Islands, and it has been my privilege to be involved in Falkland Islands affairs and to strive for the interests of my kith and kin in the Islands for over forty years since the "Keep the Falklands British" campaign in 1967, although I must stress that I write this letter in a personal capacity, representing no other interest than my own conscience.

I write as a "Kelper" priest who understands the particular "milieu" and circumstances of the Falklands/ Malvinas situation which no "expat", however well intentioned and informed, can ever do. And as a priest I am constantly aware of the theological overtones in all that is said or done in this almost intractable situation with daily world-wide diplomatic implications. It's in the genes, or as Margaret Stewart Taylor describes it in her book, Focus On the Falkland Islands (Robert Hale - 1971), "There is a magnetism about them, (i.e. the Islands.) that does attract those of Kelper birth and those of Kelper, or part Kelper, descent.

This year sees the twenty-fifth anniversary of that war where the final battle of the Falklands took place on what had been my grandfather's farm, Mount Tumbledown and the Two Sisters Ridge. As we commemorate the sacrifice of those who fought in the conflict our resolve must be that their sacrifice should not be in vain.

Many Falkland Islanders were deeply traumatised by the events of 1982. Terry Peck, for all his bravery, "in his last years suffered from post-traumatic stress," and my last surviving elderly aunt died shortly after the cessation of hostilities. largely as a result of her experiences in Stanley of the conflict.

Your appointment, "... is to enhance the pastoral care for the Islanders and to give oversight for the Island's parish, served by Christ Church Cathedral." Under the 1936 Cathedral Constitution and a subsequent revision in 1978, the Bishop of the Falklands is also Dean of the Cathedral. We pray for you in your task, and the purpose of this "open letter" is that others too may pray for you by being properly informed as to the background and nature of that task.

How the Falklands' historical

record can be faced with courage is, of course, a very complex matter, but as a fellow priest you need to understand, not just the political history of the Falkland Islands, important though that is, but perhaps even more importantly, the ecclesiastical history of your new diocese, for the Diocese of the Falkland Islands and Christ Church Cathedral, Stanley, has a long and noble history with regard to the spread of Christ's 'Gospel of Peace and Justice' in the whole continent of South America, (with the exception of British Guyana.)

During my tenure I organised the 75th Anniversary Celebrations of the Consecration of Christ Church Cathedral in 1967 and the Centenary Celebrations of the Consecration of Bishop Stirling as first Bishop of the Falkland Islands in 1969. It was my privilege to return to the Islands, together with Archbishop of Canterbury, for the Centenary Celebrations of the Cathedral and the 10th Anniversary of the conflict in 1992

The implications of a bishop being an international peace-maker in South American politics are staggering indeed, but the theological and ecclesiastical foundations have been well and truly laid in the past day-to-day history of the Diocese of the Falkland Islands for you to build upon a solid bed-rock of past events, although the task will be far from easy, for the Falklands are being kept in virtual, and expensive, isolation by the intransigent attitude and actions of the government of Argentina with regard to travel, commerce, diplomatic relations and much else

From the earliest days of settlement there was constant contact and traffic with the mainland of South America, both Argentina and Chile. Early settlement farmers, including my grandparents, imported their tencing, building materials and livestock from Chile or Patagonia via Punta Arenas. There was a regular "ferry service" between the Islands and the mainland so much so that at least one Falkland Islands family permanently settled in Chile and has written about their life in both countries. Right up until the mid 1950s several Falklands farm managers were trained as cadets on estancias in Argentina, and St George's School in Buenos Aires educated many a Falkland Islands lad. Sadly all this came to an abrupt and unnecessary halt which was no fault of Great Britain or the Falkland Islands.

However, when we look at the history of the Diocese of the Falkland Islands we see opportunities for a way out of the impasse. Christians are called upon to be peacemakers, and our common allegiance to Christ with those of our brethren in South America makes us "one through the blood of the cross." That's a fairly basic theological point which doesn't need spelling out.

Our fellowship in the Anglican Communion should make contact with our fellow churchmen in the Inglesia Anglicana del Cono Sur de

America (i.e. Southern Cone Province.) fairly easy. But when we examine the history of the Diocese of the Falkland Islands it's here that we see the greatest opportunities for bridge building and breaking down the barriers of partition, leading to greater understanding of, and in-volvement in church life and witness by Anglicans both on the continent of South America and in the Falkland Islands.

From the earliest days there have been close personal and formal links with the Church on the mainland of South America. The Patagonian Missionary Society had bought Keppel Island and used it as a base and training centre for native Fuegian Indians from February 1855. The first Anglican Bishop of South America, Waite Hockin Stirling, was a Keppel Island based missionary for seven years from 1862 until 1869 when he was summoned from Ushuaia to become first Bishop of the Falkland Islands.

Although for obvious reasons the administrative centre of the Diocese has always been Buenos Aires, the Cathedral and Mother Church of Anglicanism on the continent of South America has always been Christ Church Cathedral, Stanley, Falkland Islands, where all bishops from Stirling to Bishop Daniel Ivor Evans in 1946 have been properly enthroned as Bishops of the Diocese of the Falkland Islands. covering the whole of South America with the exception of British Guyana, save for the east and west coast division of the Diocese between 1910 and1937

This tangible link between the Bishop and his 'Cathedra' cannot be underestimated in practical, spiritual or psychological terms. Bishop Stirling and his successor, Bishop Edward F. Every (1902-1910), retained the post of Mission Superintendent, so it was for the needs of the South American Mission Field that the Diocese of the Falkland Islands came into being. For obvious practical political reasons the South American Missionary Society working in Argentina are reluctant to acknowledge this Falklands' connection, but there is no reason why those in the Falkland Islands, where this link is largely forgotten, should not again be made aware and become proud of their illustrious missionary past.

Half the cost of building Christ Church Cathedral came from the continent of South America, and so practically all Anglicans in South America have a "bricks and morinterest in their Mother tar" Church. Here is a literal tangible bridge-building icon. Until recent times there was freedom of movement of the clergy from South America to the Falklands. Even under the revised constitution 1 believe the four honorary canonries are still in existence, although in abeyance, and one of your first tasks might well be to appoint suitable persons from the mainland, e.g. the Bishop of Chile, to these stalls as a real "flesh and blood" link with the wider church on the mainland, especially if it were a requirement that

such honorary canons had to deliver an address in person biennially!

These Cathedral "ambassadors" could be a very real local voice for the Falklands in times of crisis, but equally it strengthens personal ties between the Islands and the mainland.

After Bishop Evans' tragic death in southern Chile in 1963 the overlarge Diocese was divided into three in 1964, but with only two bishops.

Ken Howell became Bishop of Chile, Bolivia and Peru, and Cyril Tucker became Bishop of Argentina and Eastern South America with the Falkland Islands, and was consecrated under two separate mandates. Bishon Tucker raised the status of St John's pro-Cathedral in Buenos Aires to that of a full Cathedral, but even so he was propcrly enthroned as Bishop of the Falkland Islands in Christ Church Cathedral in 1965, just before I arrived in 1966.

Bishop Tucker's sympathies at first were very pro-Argentine and he upset many loyal Anglican Falkland Islanders in my day, for he seemed determined to "downgrade" Christ Church Cathedral to little more than a parish church, in which, sadly, he largely succeeded.

Your appointment as "Bishop of the Falkland Islands" once again brings the Diocese to the fore and hopefully will once again raise the profile of the Cathedral to its former position as the "Mother Church of Anglicanism" in South America which will provide important teaching material for the Islands' inhabitants, for forty years of negation and neglect encompasses almost two generations.

One sure way of raising the profile of the Cathedral is to restore the title of "Dean" to the resident incumbent. The job description is the same now as it was when the office of Dean was initiated in 1892. Given the fact that many residents are unchurched and therefore not interested, and that ex-pats really have no long-term interest in such matters, this could be an uphill task, but my knowledge and experience of true Kelpers leads me to believe that such an effort will yield great rewards, for it will bring about a sense of native historical pride in a Falkland Islands' venture which has had a lasting effect throughout South America with great relevance to the present.

There are to be many 25th Anniversary commemorations of the ending of the Falklands War this summer which ensured that the wishes of my kith and kin in the Islands to remain British will be respected, but they do not wish to remain isolated.

With your help and the in-formed prayers of those who have "The Uttermost Part of The World" inscribed indelibly upon their hearts, perhaps we can "break down (some of) the walls of partition.' Peter Millam


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Remembering Douglas Morrison OBE

DOUG was born at North Arm on May 11, 1925, the youngest child of a large family. His father. Donald, died a young man and his mother Emily Biggs had to move to Stanley with her family.

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Doug attended school in Stanley and when he turned he joined the service of the Falkland Islands Government as a messenger with the Electrical and Telegraph Department. In 1942 he moved up to the post of Clerk and in 1944 moved to the Quartermaster's Office of the FIDF.

In 1945 he took up the post of Clerk at the Chief Secretary's Office moving onto Chief Clerk in 1957. Ten years later he was Postmaster and in 1973 he took up his final position of Deputy Chief Secretary.

Doug was awarded the OBE in the New Year's honours list in 1976.

He met his wife Jean while on holiday in Carnoustie. Scotland in 1957 and they were married in Stanley on Christmas Eve 1959.

Doug retired in May 1981 and they settled in Carnoustie. Over the 26 years in Linefield Road they enjoyed visits from many Islanders and hearing Falklands news.

Doug's father was born on the Island of Scalpay, off Harris in the Western Isles and he and Jean were able to meet up with two cousins and many second cousins there, an



experience they likened to being in the Falklands as they were made so welcome.

Doug also met up with relatives from America when they visited Scotland and they and the Scalpay relatives gave them great support during Doug's illnesses.

Doug's troubles health-wise started in 1985 when he had cancer of the bone in his arm; the diseased bone was removed in 1986 and he had a prothesis inserted. This was successful for a number of years but in 1998 due to infections he had to have his arm amputated. He coped very well this and carried on planting his veg garden, etc. He was a true Islander.

2006 was a bad year for the Morrisons with Doug needing more chemotherapy. The final blow came in early November when he became unsteady on his feet and was taken into Ninewells Hospital in Dundee on November 9.

An MRI scan showed a large tumour on his spine. By this time he had no feeling in his left leg and his right leg felt numb. He was told he would have no further use of his legs or the lower part of his body.

At that time he suffered a great deal of pain and all he wanted to do was to go to sleep and not wake up. This was denied him until 6 am on Friday, February 2, when he died peacefully in the Lochleven Nursing home near Dundee, with his wife and her brother beside him.

One of the night nurses told Jean that she had talked to Doug about the Falklands because her husband had been stationed here.

With the recent passing of Gene Williams, Terry Peck and now Doug, all keen footballers in their youth, the world seems a sadder place.

Doug never forgot his homeland. We were very fortunate to have the support of so many Islanders, from the Falklands, UK, Australia and New Zealand during his long illness as well as family and friends here. By the family of the late Doug Morrison.

Police powers under review by Evidence Bill committee

COUNCILLORS have been examining the Police and Criminal Evidence Bill, in order to update the way the police carry out their duties.

The Bill introduces some new provisions which have been in British law for some time, thus updating the law.

A Select Committee was established to discuss the Bill and a long discussion was held on the first chapter which concerns the power of stop and search.

Council spokesperson. Cllr Mike Summers, commented, "Like all law, you are trying to find the correct balance between the powers of the police to carry out their duties to prevent criminal activity and the rights of citizens not to be held up in their daily routine."

Under the Bill, the powers to stop and search are extended to the point that it is not necessary to have a warrant to search somebody but there must nevertheless be reasonable suspicion.

The powers of stop and search have also include road checks. Inspector Len McGill of the Royal Falkland Islands Police said reasonable grounds must be given for this move.

He explained. "There are many safe guards, including, in the case of road checks, the requirement that they must all be authorised by an officer of the rank of Inspector or above.

"There must always be reasonable grounds to suspect that such a road check will provide the person or items sought which must be specified in each case. This means that random, speculative road checks cannot be carried out. It also introduces a reporting process to the Governor." (The new Bill introduces the requirement for a report to be presented to the Governor annually providing information on detention in certain circumstances.)

Chapter two of the Bill deals with the powers of entry, search and seizure on private property. The issues are much the same as with stop and search, Cllr Summers said. "It is ensuring the police have the powers they require to continue to police effectively whilst citizens are not unduly put upon.

upon. "Again, we were satisfied that the balance looked about right."

A new power of arrest without warrant is included in the Bill. Inspector McGill explained,

"In general terms this will allow an officer to arrest a person for any offence as long as certain conditions and reasons apply in each case."

The effect of this new power of arrest without warrant, he said, is to make it less complex. "It allows officers to use their discretion, considering the reasonable grounds that may exist and if it is necessary to arrest the person in question in each situation. This power of arrest has become known as the 'Reasonable Grounds and Necessity power of arrest'."

In part three of the Bill, chapter two introduces the concept of being able to introduce into court evidence of bad character. This is a very new law in the UK and not yet particularly well tested, Cllr Summers said. "We were not really satisfied in Select Committee that it could or should be done here and we have tasked the Attorney General to produce some policy papers on the issues involved and whether we should or should not consider doing this.

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"The balance of likelihood is that we won't and we wish to be assured that the Bill is drafted in such as way that when it comes to LegCo we can just take that out."

In a small society such as the Falklands, Cllr Summers said, "...it is even more important that you are not effectively tried for a case before you even arrive in court."

"The principal concern," he said, "is to make sure there is a proper balance between police powers and the rights of citizens not to be harassed."

Five trawlers called into Port William - Saga Sea, Argos Vigo.




Above: As Hanseatic leaves Stanley Harbour, HMS Dumbarton Castle arrives. Picture: G France

Air travel advice for insulin dependent diabetics

FOLLOWING the recent tightening of security at airports Diabetes UK have issued the following guidelines for people with diabetes who are planning to travel by plane. Ideally try to carry a note from

your doctor explaining why you need to take medication on board, or a diabetes ID card that displays your photo and is signed by your doctor or nurse. Alternatively carry a prescription with your name on it.

All diabetes equipment should be placed in a clear plastic bag. Check in staff and cabin crew

should be made aware of the need to carry diabetes equipment and food or drink.

A spare set of diabetes equipment should be carried in case of loss or damage.

You should take double the amount of medication you expect to use on your travels. This is because you may need to increase your dose in case of illness.

In November further changes were made to their policy for allowing liquids on board aircraft, this means that the amount of insulin and syringes/pens needed for a trip may be carried on board.

Should the check-in staff insist that you place any insulin in the hold the advice from manufacturers of insulin advice that it should be in an airtight container (such as a flask) in the middle of your suitcase. If an airtight container is not available wrap the insulin in bubble wrap, then in a towel and again place in the middle of your suitcase. Travelling at altitude may cause the baggage to freeze, which would damage the insulin.

Before travelling try to find out where you can get further supplies of insulin at your destination, in case of emergency.

For general diabetes management, people with diabetes should carry starchy carbohydrate foods. such as biscuits, and soft drinks, e.g. diet cola and water, on board the aircraft. These must be purchased after going through customs

Glucose tablets. Lucozade and fluids used to treat hypos can be carried on board along with longer acting carbohydrates such as biscuits. Again, these must be purchased after going through customs. The updated guidance still only permits liquids in containers of up to 100mls through the security control

Please note that there are different food and drink regulations in place for people travelling to the USA. People are not allowed to take drinks on to these flights but food and glucose tablets can be carried. Again these must be purchased after going through customs.

GREASY wool sales experienced a relatively calm week in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia last week.

This stated however, prices finished down at the very fine end of the market, prices were up for midmicron lots and were described as 'firm" at the very broad end of the micron spectrum.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, prices eased by 9 pence per kilogram clean for 18 micron fleece wool lots, gained 5 to 10 pence per kilogram clean for 21 to 24 micron lots and gained a few pence per kilogram clean for lots between 28 and 32 micron.

The distribution of wool on offer last week in Australia was slightly different to what might be considered "normal". This was due to the Southern Australian sale occurring in Tasmania, as opposed to the usual venue of Melbourne.

The Tasmanian sale tended to contain a greater proportion of fine and very fine wool lots (where average and below average styles struggled) and less mid-micron wool (up in value) than normal Melbourne sales

The AWEX "Eastern Market In-dicator" (EMI) finished the week up 1 penny per kilogram clean at 369.0 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 368.0 pence per kilogram clean.

Strong wool combing and spinning demand, relatively low stocks in the wool pipeline, plus reduced wool supply (particularly in Aus-tralia) remain as key market drivers for the mid term.

In South Africa 97% of the 6.237 bales available were sold

Standard Wool, G Modiano and A Dewavrin were once again very active in the market buying almost 66% of the offering between them.

In Australia only 89% of the 59,391 bales presented to the trade changed hands.

Included in the offering were 5.042 bales of crossbred wool of which 88% was sold, 88% of the 20.852 bales available in New Zealand were sold at auction.

Next week approximately 103,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia. Note:

Top golfers battle it out in the Stanley Open

A GOOD field of 21 players turned out for the Stanley Golf Club flagship event, the 2007 Stanley Open, sponsored by HSBC Insurance Brokers Ltd and Consultancy Services Falklands Ltd.

There was an incredible array of prizes on offer to add to the prestige of the competition.

The Open is a two-day event with rounds played on Saturday and Sunday. Saturday was cool with a stiff southwest wind making conditions difficult for all. However, some very good scores were re-turned with Glenn Ross leading the way with a round of 75. Troyd Bowles was in second with 76 and Kevin Clapp third with 78. The best individual performance of the first day was by Adam Glanville who returned a score of 79 which, with his handicap of 16 gave him a substantial lead in the nett score competition with a nett 63.

Sunday was a better day although the wind was still from the southwest. Players teed off in reverse order with the leaders teeing of last.

The wind blowing across the first fairway and the morning sun played havoc, with many players losing their ball and having to take penalty drops on the first hole of the day. Not the ideal start.

The leaders teed off at 9.50am. Kevin Clapp led the way with a solid drive down the left side of the fairway. Troyd Bowles was next to go and inexplicably managed to top his tee shot about 30 yards, narrowly avoiding complete disaster as his ball just cleared the water hazard in front of the tee. Glenn Ross was last to go and played a solid shot down the left side of the fairway.

Troyd managed to recover slightly with a nice second shot to leave a comfortable approach to the green. However disaster struck again as he shanked his third shot into the rough and eventually limped off the par four hole with a seven. Kevin also had problems with a misshit second shot leading to an opening six. Glenn in the mean time kept his concentration and got a solid par four, stretching his lead to four over Troyd and five over Kevin after just one hole.

Kevin continued to struggle with a double bogey five on the second and more trouble on the third.

Troyd steadied the ship with par threes on the second and third and Glenn stayed solid with fours.

Kevin got his game going with a brilliant birdie on the fourth and the rest of the front nine was played out with all three players sharing pars and bogies to keep things close. The scores after nine holes saw Glenn with a two-shot lead over Troyd after a 39 front nine.

Troyd and Kevin both had 40 front nines, which meant Kevin was four off the lead. The back nine started off steady with the three players matching each other's score until the short par four thirteenth. Glenn and Kevin both hit solid drives to just short of the green whilst Troyd pushed his drive to the right and off the fairway. Glenn hit an awesome chip that almost dropped for eagle and led to a good birdie. Kevin also chipped close to match the birdie. Troyd wasn't so lucky and ended up with a poor bogie five.

The tough par four fourteenth provided more drama as Troyd (four behind at this point) hit a long drive followed by a near perfect nine iron to 18 inches from the flag for a rare birdie on this hole. Kevin kept up the pressure with a very good par and Glenn played another solid hole for a bogie five. Glenn now led by two from Troyd and three from Kevin with four holes to play.

The fifteenth is a relatively easy par five, however for this years' Open the green keeper had placed the flag on a side slope reminiscent of an Olympic ski jump. Glenn and Kevin both achieved very good pars whilst Troyd again faltered with a bogey six.

The par three sixteenth saw Troyd's last challenge with a good tee shot to six feet, whilst Kevin and Glenn both missed the green. However Glenn again held off the challenge with a brilliant chip that clipped the flagstick to leave a tap in par. Kevin followed suit but Troyd now needed to hole his putt for any chance - it turned at the last to remain above ground.

The short 17th was where Troyd faded out of the equation but Kevin came to the fore to push Glenn all the way. Kevin's tee shot was perfect to leave a 10-foot putt straight up hill. Glenn also found the green but Troyd was short finishing with a bogey four. Glenn made a good two-putt par Kevin showed he wasn't giving up the chase with a superb putt for a birdie two.

All this now meant Glenn had a two-shot lead from Kevin and a four shot lead from a fading Troyd.

The last hole is a par five so a birdie or even eagle from Kevin could still have given Glenn problems. Glenn and Kevin both hit the fairway with solid drives whilst Troyd missed the fairway right. Glenn was first to play his second and hit a good lay up leaving about 170 yards into the hole. Kevin took on the stream that challenges the second shot, carrying it comfortably to leave a short approach for his third -Troyd continued to hack his way down the hole skilfully avoiding the fairway to finish with a disappointing seven.

Glenn now faced a shot into the green knowing that Kevin was in birdie position on the fairway. He continued his stellar play with a good approach that rolled just off the bottom side of the green leaving a fairly easy uphill chip. Kevin now knew that he had to go close with his third, however he didn't get the shot quite how he wanted leaving a putt of some 30 feet for birdie. 



Seamen jump ship: two lost

A GROUP of fishermen who jumped ship in Stanley Harbour on Monday have told police of alleged ill treatment on board

Two men are feared dead after they and eight of their ship mates jumped overboard from the jigger, *Jih Da Gan*, while it was in Stanley Harbour to collect an illex squid hcence. Despite being unable to swim, they were trying to reach the north shore of the harbour.

The vessel is owned by the Wa Da Fishery Co Ltd and flagged in Tatwan. Two of the men who jumped overboard were Chinese, the rest Indonesian.

Falkland Islands Company (FIC) launches were in the area very quickly after the men jumped at around 5pm on Monday, and eight of the crew were found and taken to the East Jetty where they were transferred to KEMH.

A further search was begun with assistance from the Fire and Rescue Service. Falkland Islands Defence Force and members of the Explosive Ordnance Disposal. Many other individuals also assisted. They, together with the launch crews from FIC and Sulivan Shipping Ltd, carried out a detailed and concentrated search of the water, beaches and the shore, including the Camber.

Searches by air were carried out by the Falkland Islands Government Air Service and the RAF, including an infrared search. Nothing further was found and the search was called off just after 8pm.

The eight survivors spent the night in KEMH and were provided with clothes and toiletries by the Seamen's Mission. Chief Medical Officer, Dr Roger Diggle said all the men were suffering from hypother-

mia, "...which responded well to rewarming." While they were relieved to discover that they were not going to be sent back to the ship, he said, they were concerned to discover what had happened to the two missing men.

Some of the men had injuries that they alleged were due to brutality aboard the ship and these allegations are being investigated by the police.

Inspector Len McGill said the interview process was "slow" due to "language barriers" but confirmed the men had alleged ill treatment on board. He reported yesterday that the interviews were nearing completion and police would not be boarding the vessel until this was finished.

Meanwhile efforts continue to locate the two missing crew men who are believed to have perished. Inspector McGill said local vessels are carrying out sonar searches: "They are searching a pattern from the vessel in areas we think the bodies might have moved with the tide." A number of targets had been identified, he said, but the bodies have not yet been found.

Coastline searches of the harbour and Hadassa Bay are also being carried out daily at low tide. Repatriation

The men who were safely collected will be repatriated if that is their preferred option. Councillor Andrea Clausen told *Penguin News*, and "every effort" will be made to ensure that the fishing company pays for the repatriation.

As for the reasons why the men jumped ship, Cllr Clausen did not wish to speculate, however she did comment, "...it appears at this stage that they jumped due to intolerable conditions on the vessel."

East ferry terminal to be at Newhaven - West still undecided

ROAD building resources next summer should be focused on the construction of a ferry terminal at Newhaven. That was a recommendation made by the Transport Advisory Committee (TAC) at its meeting on Tuesday.

Where the permanent terminal will be located on West Falkland -Port Howard or south of Second Creek - is still to be decided.

The new ferry, provided by Workboat Services Ltd (WSL), is expected to begin operation as early as July this year and, in the meantime, temporary terminals will have to be opened until the permanent terminals are completed. Roads Engineer Bob Hancox told the meeting that WSL was keen to have the temporary terminal for East Falkland at Port San Carlos, as a breakwater would have to be built at Newhaven were the temporary terminal sited there.

However, due to the condition of the road to Port San Carlos, this would limit the types of loads which could be carried to meet the ferry (when the roads are saturated).

Were Port San Carlos to be approved for the temporary terminal, the TAC decided WSL should be encouraged to use the jetty which is already there and possibly crane goods aboard, negating the need to construct a ramp

However, this would also limit the type of vehicles which could use the ferry.

As for the temporary ramp on West Falkland, the TAC heard that this was relatively straightforward to construct at Port Howard.

However, with regard to the permanent terminal, no final decision has yet been made on where it will be built as further costing has to be carried out.

Representatives of the TAC are to meet with WSL in the near future to discuss the terminals.

Yachtsman stops for repairs

THIRTY-SIX days into the second stage of the gruelling Velux 5 Oceans (formerly known as Around Alone) yacht race, New Zealander Graham Dalton (53) has made a pit stop in the Falklands for repairs to his yacht, *A Southern Man AGD*.

On Wednesday Graham was towed into Stanley harbour by a Falkland Islands Company launch where Ian Bury and Mike McKay carried out repairs to the rudder, mast and steering. At the time of printing, he was hoping to get back into the race this morning (Friday) - he is currently in fourth place (of five remaining yachts).

As the repairs were completed yesterday Graham said he had been "heartened" by the willingness of people to help and the way they had immediately rallied around. He said he hoped to set sail at Sam today (Friday) and get back into the race.

The Velux 5 Oceans is the longest race for any individual in any sport, however the five skippers still in the second leg of the race that started in October know it is a marathon and not a sprint.

During the 30,000 mile race the yachts will encounter some of the most extreme sea and weather conditions on the planet.

Sports Week kicks off

SPORTS Week, the time traditionally set aside to celebrate the end of shearing in the Falklands, begins on Sunday.

THE tragic events in Stanley Harbour were certainly not the desirable start to the celebrations of the 20th anniversary of the fishery, however they serve as a poignant reminder of the difficult environment fishermen work in.

With the ships predominantly working out of sight it's easy to forget how tough conditions are on board. The work is difficult and perilous - you need only to sit in on an inquest into an at-sea death to appreciate this. (What is often most shocking is how quickly and violently it can happen: one minute they are on deck assisting the haul, the next they have been whisked overboard, and never seen alive again.)

In addition to the dangerous nature of the job, there are the stories of abuses carried out on board some ships (descriptions of which would make you feel physically sick) and while we can't do much about the former, we have to do something about the latter.

Our affluence is almost entirely due to the money we make from fishing and while it is wrong to say we are oblivious to the human rights abuses which go on out there in the fishing grounds, it is not exactly at the constant forefront of people's minds.

As for the episode this week, it has been played out so blatantly under our noses we don't have the option of turning a blind eye.

Everyone is speculating on the types of conditions these men must have lived in, conditions that were clearly so unbearable for them they were willing to risk their lives to escape. Two men took the risk and lost

We now have an opportunity and an obligation - if criminal activity is proven - to bring the perpetrators to justice, sending the message out that such behaviour is unacceptable.

It's not a new story - remember the letter from staff at the medical department, so troubled after they treated Korean fishermen who jumped ship in 1998, they risked disciplinary proceedings to speak out? - but the longer it goes on, the more ashamed we should feel.

It is easy to feel there is nothing we can do - legally our hands are tied when it comes to the prosecution of criminal activity outside our twelve mile limit - but surely we have a humanitarian obligation to ensure ship owners have their licence threatened if they allow abuse to be carried out on board?

We should exercise that power as often as is necessary. There may be financial implications for us in punishing companies by revoking or refusing licences, but do we really want to be known as a society that profits from abused fishermen?



'The school is in good hands'

THE man who stepped in to run the leader-less Community School last year is confident he is leaving the school in good hands.

David Higgins (right), who was formerly Headteacher of the Community School for five years until 2001, was asked to return in September to run the school temporarily, following the sudden resignation of the then Head, Alan Purvis.

After a term and a half at the school, Mr Higgins returns to the UK this weekend. For the remainder of this academic year, Katherine Nelson will assume the role of Acting Headteacher.

Mr Higgins says he is leaving the school in safe hands. "I am confident things will run well. I think Katherine is very strong and has the support of the vast majority of the staff."

When Mr Higgins arrived in September, morale among staff was low following the departure of Mr Purvis. At the time, he says, he was clear to the Director of Education, Barbara Booth, that there was little he could do in a term other than raise that morale, something which he appears to have achieved

He paid tribute to his staff: "1 was here for five years before, and I would say that the staff that are here now are the most overall talented staff I've seen in the Falklands.

Much has been talked in recent years about the degradation of the behaviour of a small number of students at the Community School and Mr Higgins said he picked this up immediately

However, he added, "Generally speaking, the kids here are fine. It's the same as in any society - you could probably name fifty people who if you shipped out of the Falklands would make it a better place. Similarly, I could probably name four students who if they weren't here would make the school a better place. "But I think that's the same in

every school around the world.

The key to managing these challenging children, Mr Higgins believes, lies in the co-operation of parents. He says the school is "winning" the battle against disruptive behaviour and this is down to cooperation.

"I would like to thank the parents of even the most challenging pupils for showing support when

they've been called in." While he is supportive of children being aware of their rights, equally he believes they should be aware of their responsibilities: "Too often when the need for children to have rights is talked about, you don't hear people talk about responsibilities...



"There have been times when 1 have said to pupils, 'You are the child; the teacher is in charge in the school, whatever you say.

Restructuring ideas

It has been well documented that the process was flawed but there are good ideas contained within the proposals for restructuring education, Mr Higgins said, ideas which the staff

have endorsed from the start. "The attempts to put a bit of career structure in, to raise status of Learning Support Assistants, to introduce Deputy Heads into the schools, the Home/School Liaison idea... Generally speaking, I think had the process been right, there wouldn't have been so much angst about it. From that bad start things have improved.

Director's gratitude The Director of Education, this week publicly thanked Mr Higgins for the work he has done over the last term and a half

"Returning to the Islands at very short notice, David soon made his presence felt. He quickly established a calm and stable atmosphere at FICS following a period of diffi-

"Whilst here he has worked with staff to formulate new policies, to review the timetable and has worked closely with the Director and colleague headteachers to inform and shape the restructuring of the Education Department as a whole." She continued, "The Education

Department is grateful for his clear commitment to the staff and students of the Falkland Islands and the wealth of experience and professionalism he brought to all our deliberations.

Looking back at his term and a half at the school. Mr Higgins said he was grateful to the staff and children at the Community School for their support and he wished them all "every success."

The government does have some powers to take action, Cllr Clausen said, but this will be dependant upon the outcome of the police investigation.

"The Fisheries Ordinance does have provisions to address issues of maltreatment of the crew. If the police investigation is not fruitful in terms of being able to bring a conviction then the Director of Fisheries does have other means of addressing this situation, however, this will not be considered until the police have completed their investigation.

Falklands code responsible for odd calls

THE Falklands' unique country code is responsible for a number of odd phone calls Islanders receive

Penguin News has received reports from Cable and Wireless customers of strange overseas calls from unidentified numbers

Justin McPhee of Cable and Wireless says the 500 code is used by many countries to provide premium or non-geographic services and are accessed by dialling a 0. For example 0500 numbers in the UK are often used for free phone services. If a customer inadvert-ently dials 00500 rather than 0500 the call is connected to the Falklands rather than the service they required in the UK.

If the first five digits match a valid Falklands number the call will be connected irrespective of any

additional digits that are dialled." For example, a UK customer trying to dial BBC Radio 2 - 0500 288291 - who actually dials 00500 288291 would be connected to the Falklands: "If 28829 was a valid number the call is connected and the remaining digits - in this case a 1 - are simply discarded

Mr McPhee said Cable and Wireless has identified calls that have been connected to Falkland's customers from all over the world. While we are able to identify some of the countries that the calls originate from it is not possible to prevent them as the initial call setup is dependant on the network that originates the call '

Country codes are set by the In-ternational Telecommunications Union (ITU)

Tuesday airbridge flight has new departure time


PASSENGERS travelling on the Ministry of Defence airbridge should note there has been a change made to the schedule - whilst dates will not change, the timings will.

Page 6 **'Hostile Skies' Harrier pilot returns**

A HARRIER pilot in 1982 and now an accomplished author. David Morgan is in the Falklands this week for the first time since the conflict.

He spent the last five days predominantly in Camp, showing his wife. Caroline, the places which have had such a bearing on the last 25 years of his life. He hoped the visit would also allow him the chance to lay personal ghosts to rest.

In 1982 David Morgan was an RAF officer, on secondment to the Royal Navy. For many years after the conflict he suffered from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and said he only really got himself, "sorted out" over the last two or three years. Writing his book *Hostile Skies* was a great help, "...as it made me re-live the emotions of '82."

Speaking to *Penguin News* before he flew to the Islands, David said he was keen to visit the places which held particular resonance for him.

Stanley airport was high on his list, as he was hit by 20mm fire during the attack on May 1 - his first experience of warfare. "After completing my bomb run, 1 dived into a huge cloud of smoke next to the control tower before running out over Surf Bay.

"I thought that the tower was considerably higher than it is and was rather disconcerted afterwards to find that I had been flying blind well below twenty feet!"

He wanted to visit Nick Taylor's grave at Goose Green, as well as the British and Argentine cemeteries, and also Shag Cove, to look at the wrecks of three Argentine helicopters which he "bounced" on May 23 and destroyed with canon and wing-tip vortices. "They were carrying missiles and mortar bombs up to Port Howard. The first Puma I flew into the ground by passing about ten feet over him in a high G turn - the cheapest kill of the war..."

Another site David visited was the wreck of a Skyhawk near Hammond Point. This was downed by his wing-man on June 8, after David had emptied his guns at him without a gun-sight. "Unfortunately, the two Skyhawks I shot down with Sidewinders both fell into Choiseul Sound and as far as I know, have never been recovered.

"If anyone has ever found any wreckage from them, or knows if either of the pilots were ever found, I would be very interested to hear from them. Likewise, if anyone witnessed the raid on the airfield, the Shag Cove engagement or the fight in Choiseul Sound at dusk on May 8. I would be very interested to talk to them."

David admitted that he experienced mixed feelings about returning to the Islands. "I am sure that some of the places will trigger old emotions, but that can only be healthy. My wife is very much looking forward to seeing the Islands and also some of the wildlife."



I'VE just learnt of the sad passing of Fred Ford and wish to offer my condolences.

I am the surviving crew-member from the two Gazelle helicopters shot down on May 21, 1982 and Fred, along with others, was instrumental in assisting me and my mortally-wounded mate, Andy Evans, in our time of need

The Gazelle helicopter I was in, that was shot down has been saved from scrap and is now owned by Aeroventure Museum in England. Some of their people visited recently and I know Fred looked after them.

The helicopter is being restored by the British military and will be part of the 25th Anniversary events at RAF Waddington in June before returning to its home at the museum and I hope to get back there from Australia for the ceremony.

As the sole survivor I have been involved in helping get the details of what happened correct. While I am more than aware of Fred's part, and that of his sons (pictured); what I would like to find out is more about the other people present that day. There was a young lady (with nursing training) who assisted me in trving to save Andy's life; there were a couple of other men present (standing watch and keeping an eye on the Argentines' movements); plus a much older lady whose house I think we were in.

'Building bridges of understanding' | Science Minister off to learn in Antarctica

REGARDLESS of the sovereignty dispute. Argentina and the Falklands could benefit from getting to know each other better. That was the resounding message from six Argentines who were in the Islands last week

The six, who all previously studied in the UK as part of the British Government's "Chevening" pro-gramme, were keen to stress they were speaking personally - not politically.

Lawyer Andrés Zenarruza, eco-nomic consultant Franco Fugazza, PR Matras Campodónico and journalists Sonia Jalfin. Jorge Liotti and Eugenia Mitchelstein, split their time between Stanley and Camp and say they were struck by the cultural differences of the two. Franco commented, "Stanley is more British,

Camp is more Camp." Matias added, "There are many traces of the Spanish/Argentine presence such as the words that are used in Camp - the words for saddles and places for instance. It is interesting that people keep them and embrace the tradition.

Eugenia felt that if the group had only stayed in Stanley, they would have missed an integral part of life in the Falklands. "It was great that we were able to see the different lifestyle and it was very interesting to get to know people who didn't live in Stanley.

The visit was an initiative of the six scholars; Andrés said they had felt it would be useful for a group of people with strong links to the UK to visit and approached the British Embassy in Buenos Aires with the idea.

Sonia explained. "There is a particular way the Falklands is portrayed in Argentina but there is not much knowledge about the people here. I don't think we had many preconceptions - we didn't know much about the people and the life here now, we only had some idea of what happened 25 years ago. We have had a good chance to meet people and have face to face relations and start to understand a little bit more about life here."

Andrés said that, unsurprisingly, there had been a mixed reaction to the group's visit.

He explained, "As part of the agenda we wanted to visit a school. When we got to the secondary school there was a group of fifteen and sixteen year olds going into the gym. Two were wearing Argentine football shirts which was a nice gesture - they knew we were going to the school

"But also we were told that some parents didn't want their children to be at the school that day and one professor (sic) didn't want us to visit her classroom

I think that gives some balance of what it has been like." Sonia added, "The people who

wanted to talk to us talked to us and those that didn't want to didn't. It's fair enough.

The group are in favour of "building bridges of understanding" between Argentines and Falkland Is-

landers - on a non-political level. Eugenia commented, "We are. after all, neighbours and life is very difficult if you are not on good terms with your neighbour, generally speaking. If more people came here and if people from the Falklands could travel to Argentina it

would be better all round." Sonia agreed: "It's good if peo-ple can talk to other people, and not just keep all relations at a gov-ernment level."

Some in the group felt the uniqueness of the Falklands was not well understood and that Islanders did not perhaps know as much about their history as they could.

Franco commented, "In Argen-tina and in the UK, not many people know the history of the Islands, and here it seems not many people know about the history because it's not really taught at school."

Sonia said she had tried to find academic research into the Islands before the visit and was surprised to find there had been few sociological or anthropological studies conducted on the Falklands. "So for us it has been interesting to discover first hand what the Islanders are like.

The group are planning to supply a report on their visit to the British Embassy in Buenos Aires; a copy will be sent to the Falklands.

ON THE eve of International Polar Year, Science and Innovation Minister Malcolm Wicks (right) is visiting the British Antarctic Survey's Rothera research station this week.

During the visit the Minister will have an opportunity to see first-hand the prestigious UK Government-funded facility that carries out world-leading research into global environmental issues.

At Rothera he will learn how human impact on the planet is observed in Antarctica. From the discovery of the ozone hole to the unique record of the Earth's past climate found in ice cores, through to the impact that Antarctica has on the global climate system.

British Antarctic Survey Director. Professor Chris Rapley CBE, will introduce Mr Wicks to around 100 science and support staff and brief him on the science that underpins and informs international agreements on climate change.

Mr Wicks spent one night in the Falklands before boarding the BAS Dash-7 for his flight to Antarctica. He told Penguin News the focus of his visit would essentially be on climate change and global warming, however he added. ... the work that our scientists are doing in Antarctica teaches us a lot more generally about our planet, how it has changed over millions of years, and how, for good or ill, it may be changing in the future.

Mr Wicks has only been Sci-



ence Minister for three months; before that he was Minister for Energy. He said he wanted to learn more about what science has to offer in terms of the "big issues" facing the planet and Britain. But he also wanted to celebrate "the fact we are very, very good at science in Britain.

He explained, "If you look at the Nobel Prize winners we produce, or at indicators like internationally cited papers, we are second on a whole range of sciences only to the United States.

'So, as well as finding out the contribution of science in places like Antarctica, I'd like to recognise and help communicate the fact that this is a major role that Britain is playing, in terms of under-standing the beginnings of our planet, what's happened over millions of years, and some of the issues for the future."



FOR the third year in a row, Hugh-Marsden was first across the finish line in the Cape Pembroke Half Marathon

Despite a gloomy forecast, 72 runners and walkers took part in the annual event, held on Sunday, which has become a warm up for the Standard Chartered Bank Stanley Marathon in March.

Hugh was the clear winner, cross-

ing the finish line in one hour and seventeen minutes, almost five minutes ahead of Stephen Jones of Mount Pleasant

Hugh said he was "satisfied" with his time. Following the wet weather, he said the leg around the Lighthouse was "tricky" and slippery in the clay patches. Looking ahead to the marathon he said he was "apprehensive." Despite winning the marathon twice, he admitted he is "never confident" ahead of the race.

Third woman was Lisa Hudson, another-MPA runner.

The course is challenging, with both on and off-road sections. Parstretch around Cape Pembroke Lighthouse, which was waterlogged after the rain of recent weeks, and the runners emerged from this leg splattered with mud.





General Practice With Wendy Davies, Audiologist He's got a hearing aid, but doesn't wear it...sound familiar?

Audiology for Siemens in Crawley, visited the Islands earlier this month. It was her third visit to the Islands. KEMH has an annual Audiology visit (in conjunction with the Ear Nose and Throat Specialist's visit). In between visits Sue Wilks (Speech and Language Therapist) is available for help with hearing issues and hearing aids.

Why do hearing impaired people stop wearing hearing in-struments?

One in ten adults suffers from some degree of hearing loss that would benefit from amplification in the form of a hearing instrument. However many of those with

hearing loss do not use any assistance, either having previously tried an instrument and found it too difficult to adjust to or have never tried; having been put off by the experiences of friends and relatives. For many it is simply the appearance of the hearing instrument that they find unacceptable.

The most common complaint from hearing instrument wearers is that their own voice sounds as though they have their head in a bucket. This occlusion phenomenon is caused by the traditional ear mould filling up the ear canal. The ear mould fits tightly in the ear canal trapping the amplified sound from the hearing instrument. The sound pressure causes the structures of the ear canal to vibrate resulting in the 'head in a bucket' sound

The cosmetic appearance of the instrument is not always appealing. Hearing instruments have been referred to as beige bananas in the past: wearers would prefer an instrument that is discreet.

Background noise has always been an issue for hearing instrument wearers.

The analogue instruments that were provided until recently amplified every sound equally, resulting in wearers hearing unwanted background as loudly as speech. This limits the environments in which the aid can be worn and can often make listening uncomfortable.

All hearing instrument wearers are familiar with the irritating whis-tle produced by their instruments when amplified sound introduced into the ear from the aid escapes out of the ear canal and passes back to the microphone, causing acoustic feedback, i.e. whistling

Whistling can be caused by wax in the car canal, a poor fitting car mould or by placing a hand too close to the microphone. Whistling is extremely unpleasant to the wearer and those around them as well as bringing embarrassing unwanted attention

Hearing instruments can also be complicated and fiddly to use. There is a volume control to adjust, an on and off switch, a decision to be made as to where and when to use each setting. The battery only lasts a few weeks and can stop working without warning

So it is not difficult to understand why people with hearing impairment may stop using their hearing instruments but can these obstacles be overcome?

The answer is in new digital technology.

The digital chip has allowed the miniaturisation of the instruments that can be fitted with very fine tubes that are held in the ear by a lightweight flexible plastic dome. These new instruments, currently only suitable for mild hearing losses, are almost invisible to others when placed in the ear.

The lightweight dome fits less tightly in the ear allowing air to flow freely in and out of the ear removing the occlusion effect, resulting in a more natural sound.

Noise reduction algorithms are also applied using digital technology. The hearing instrument is able to filter out noise from speech and reduce it to a more comfortable level, enabling the wearer to be able to follow conversation in all situations and for background noise to always remain at a comfortable level

Whistling can be vastly reduced using feedback cancellation. The sophisticated digital hearing instrument monitors the escape of amplified sound from the ear canal to the microphone. When it becomes sufficient to cause whistling the instrument applies an inverse sound to that of the escaping amplified sound. This cancels out the whis-

tling without reducing the instruments gain or degrading the sound quality.


They mostly function automatically turning themselves up and down according to the situation and the addition of warning beeps alert the wearer when the battery is becoming low

The ability to programme the instrument via a PC enables it to be tailored to each individual's requirement to maximise speech intelligibility and minimise the effort of actually wearing the instrument.

To answer our initial question yes, new technology can overcome previous difficulties of using hearing instruments and can provide benefit to the majority of hearing impaired people.

Ground making advances are being made by Siemens in improving effectiveness and quality of hearing instruments and are making their latest products available to NHS clinics across the UK and the Falkland Islands.

Hearing instruments do require some practice and time to get used to as the brain needs to readjust to hearing long forgotten sounds but with the correct assessment and instruction the benefits of digital technology far outweigh the effort of managing without a hearing instru-

Wool market report for week ending February 16 By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices fell across much of the micron spectrum in Australia last week.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, most micron categories eased by between I and 4 pence per kilogram clean. Those that increased in value generally did so by few pence per kilogram clean.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down marginally at 368.7 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 369.0 pence per kilogram clean.

Currency issues had an impact on wool markets last week. The Australian dollar traded "stronger" against the US \$, but weaker against the Euro. Markets fell as currency relativities changed midweek

In New Zealand and Australia. well prepared, stylish, low VM, higher staple strength lots were in considerably higher demand from buyers than average and poorer style lots. Significant price differentials remain in place between such "premium types" and "average" types.

Falkland Islands farmers are urged to note the existence of price differentials between lots of varying "styles" and work with their agents to gain appropriate reward for individual lots based on their individual characteristics.

In New Zealand 78% of the 17.843 bale offering was cleared. While in Australia only 85% of the 73,411 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 10,193 bales of crossbred wool of which 85% was sold.

Next week approximately 85,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia.

Cricket: Governor's XI reclaim the ashes

match, the Governor's XI took an unassailable 2-0 series lead in the three-match series between the Falklands' team and the military side.

The Governor's XI eventually won the match by 48 runs and reclaimed the South Atlantic Ashes from the Forces' XI. Commander British

On a cold and wet Saturday, February 17, after winning the toss, the Governor's captain, Richard Marlor, elected to bat. The Governor's side got off to a fast start, with Mark McCulloch leading the charge, at a rate of seven runs per over. However, Marlor was soon back at the "pavilion", caught off a bouncer from Van Zyl, for just two. McCulloch was joined at the crease by Derek Reeves and the two of them set about the military bowlers with some gusto, with a flurry of fours and sixes. The military side made a number of uncharacteristic fielding errors, dropping catches from both McCulloch and Reeves, although the steady drizzle and occasional heavier downpour played a major part in this and in their eventual defeat. McCulloch was out bowled in the eighth over after making 32, with the score on 57. Alan Dawson then joined Reeves and the scoreboard continued to tick over rapidly, with Reeves reaching his half-century before being caught, mistiming a drive, off the bowling of Pierce on 61. This left the Governor's XI on

a score of 109 for three off 15 overs and in a good position to post a huge total. However, even though the remaining middle-order contributed to the final total and despite their best efforts, the military bowl-

ers began to peg them back and the run-rate began to slow. Dawson made 21, before being bowled by Pierce. Then 'TJ' had an inspired spell of bowling for the military team, taking four wickets at a cost 24 runs and claiming the scalps of Migs Cofre (bowled) for 13. Dan-iel Graham (caught) for 23, Jamie Anderson (bowled) for 27 and Kevin Clapp, dubiously given out caught behind (off his pads, apparently), for just two. The last remaining batsmen fell cheaply, Roger Diggle (caught) for one and David Hewitt (bowled) for zero, leaving Josh Peck not out on two.

The Governor's X1 ended up posting a more-than-respectable total of 200 all out off 39.5 overs. Pick of the bowlers for the military side were TJ - seven overs, four wickets for 24 runs - and Pierce eight overs, two wickets for 37 runs.

The CBF's batsmen took to the crease on Sunday, requiring at least five runs per over to give them any chance of taking the series to a final decisive game. They got off to a disastrous start, losing one of their opening batsman, bowled in the second over by Marlor for a duck. However, the military side dug in and held out for a further 10 overs, before Graham took out Dale's leg stump with a full-length delivery for nine. The military side were at this stage on 59 for two after 12 overs. Throughout their innings, they were always right on, but never ahead of the required run-rate, despite regularly leaking wickets thereafter. Pierce, the CBF's captain on the day, although he was dropped in the field early on in his innings, always looked the most likely batsman to put the Governor's side's total in danger and he soon reached his halfcentury, eventually going on to make 80.

Crucially. Reeves got his revenge on Pierce, taking a great catch from his own bowling to dismiss Pierce. hanging on to a fierce drive that came straight back at him. Reeves then went on to clean bowl another three military batsmen with each of the final deliveries of his last three allotted overs, essentially making the game safe for the Governor's XI

Meanwhile, Van Zyl was trying to take up where Pierce had left off and he initially made a good fist of it, eventually going on to score 44. With the military side requiring 50 runs to win off 18 overs, but with no wickets left in hand, it was soon wrapped up, with Marlor taking his own revenge on Van Zyl from the first ball of his second spell, tempt ing him into an ill-judged poke outside the off-stump, with McCulloch taking the easy catch behind the stumps.



The CBF's XI were all out for 152 runs off 32.1 overs. Pick of the bowlers for the Governor's XI were Reeves - eight overs, four wickets for 34 runs - and Marlor - 4.1 overs, two wickets for 23 runs. Reeves was the easy choice as the Man of the Match.

The final game of the series takes place on March 3, 2007, after which there will be both the presentation of the South Atlantic Ashes to the Governor's XI and the presentation of the inaugural Falklands Twenty 20 Cup to the Mount Pleasant Cricket Club.

Your questions answered

Q What is the aim of the sportsfield project?

A The following series of answers were provided by PWD Works Manager Glen Williams.

The aim of this project is to provide a safer playing surface for all users of the Sports Field. The intention is to fill all the small pot-holes that have formed in the ground as well as removing numerous rocks and stones that have appeared as a result of general wear and tear.

Additionally, it has been necessary to provide up to six inches of additional topsoil in some areas to repair the significant damage caused I would like to highlight the fact that the sportsfield has not received any ground maintenance work in 16 years and as a result maintenance work is now required for the safety of all users.

Who is the supervisor?

The PWD Works Manager under the guidance of Tim Miller

What is the time scale of it? Approximately one year. The rea-

sons for this are as follows: Firstly, this particular project came under reactive rather than planned maintenance as a result of concerns raised by both the Recreation Manager and members of the previous football committee.

In order to allow sufficient time for the new grass to grow and for the ground to become firm enough for varied usage, it was deemed nec essary to close the Sports Field for one season.

Is the project on time or how far behind is it?

Yes, the project is still on target within the planned time-scale. Furthermore, now is the perfect time for sowing the grass seed and this is already underway by Stanley Growers

Why is there no alternative when it was promised there would be? Recreation Manager, Steve Dent, re-

sponded to this question. No 'promise' was made that an alternative facility would be avail-able. On September 5, 2006 I responded to a 'Your Questions an-swered' query with; "Discussions included moving the goal posts to the end of the racecourse and rolling and marking a small pitch that would be open to full public access. SLC staff have had discussions with the PWD Maintenance Manager who has assured us that work is set to begin on the pitch as soon as the ground is dry enough. Equally, works on developing the Racecourse op-tion would be very much dependant on the racecourses ability to cope with a roller." On closer inspection of the race-

course and the rugby pitch, doubt was cast as to whether either venue would be appropriate for use as a pitch, and whether any user group would actually use any pitch devel oped in that area. Additionally, at the time that an alternative pitch was being looked at there was no roller available to carry out the work required.

No further work has been done in arranging an alternative venue

at the moment, as it is not seen as a cost effective project if no actual user group plans to utilise the space provided. If a user group was to come back to me with definite plans to utilise an alternative facility then I would be happy to work further on the project

Q WHAT procedure or provisions are in place for a judicial review if sentencing is considered inadequate?

Counsel Robert Crown McMasters kindly provided the following answer.

Unlike in the United Kingdom, there is no right of appeal for the prosecution where a sentence im-

posed by the Summary or Magistrate's Court is considered unduly lenient. There is such a provision contained in the Criminal Appeals Bill 2006 that is currently being looked at by the Legislative Council in Select Committee.

The Chief Justice (of his own motion) however, has wide ranging powers of review and where a per son has been fined in excess of £25 or sentenced to a period of imprisonment he can examine the record of the Summary or Magistrate's Court in order to satisfy himself of the correctness, legality or propri-ety of a sentence and can, if he thinks it appropriate, substitute a more severe sentence.

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Dolphins help desperate seamen Reconsider?



DOLPHINS tried to help drowning fishermen in Stanley Harbour.

Bank Manager Nick Hutton describing his conversation with Launchman John Pole-Evans explained how dolphins attempted to come to the rescue of the Indonesian seamen who jumped overboard from the fishing vessel Jih Da Gan on February 19.

He said, "For some it was all they could do to hold onto their makeshift buoyancy device," adding that when the launch reached them they could barely raise their, arms let alone use the life rings thrown out to them.

Yet, as human hands struggled to pull their frigid bodies from the water, help was being offered below the surface," said Mr Hutton whose

wife has been assisting with translation

The Indonesians who survived their brief ordeal tell of the dolphins (or 'lumba lumba' in Indonesian) that repeatedly swam under and nudged them upwards

Mr Hutton said that one of the men, Sudirman (21) from Salawesi, (second from the right with fellow crewmen) actually managed to swim to the Camber but he acknowledges it was not without the help of the porpoises that repeatedly swam under him and lifted him towards the shore

"Who knows how they knew to drive him to land and not back into the harbour?" he said.

The events of February 19 left two of the seamen missing, presumed drowned but Falkland Islanders find it remarkable that even eight survived for so long in the cold water.

How much of this can be credited to the Commerson and Peales dolphins swimming unseen below the surface we will never know, but there are eight men a long way from who home are grateful for all the help they received - human or otherwise.

A member of the crew of Jth Da Gan was arrested by Royal Falkland Islands Police on Saturday; he has since been released on police bail

Police are said to be working closely with the Principal Crown Counsel, to ascertain if there are any criminal charges to be brought.

THE decision by the Tourist Board not to appoint a well qualified Falkland Islands' applicant to the post of General Manager of Tourism has caused consternation locally.

An overseas applicant has been offered the vital role, despite respected Sulivan Shipping Development Manager Ms Debbie Summers having applied for the job. Ms Summers has a BAHons in Tourism and Leisure and a decade of experience in Falklands tourism.

The Falklands candidate was turned down in favour of a highly qualified Canadian applicant, Mr Terry Gainer.

According to a press release from the Directors of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board, "He brings to the post 25 years experience of senior executive management in the travel and tourism industries with major players, in both the private and public sectors, in Canada and the United States."

Councillor Richard Cockwell described himself as "furious," adding, "I'm extremely concerned about the message it is going to give young people who have studied hard at university and returned to the Islands. It just doesn't give young people contidence in making the Falklands their home and their career path.

"I trust the Tourist Board will reconsider their decision."

Ms Summers commented "Obviously I am deeply disappointed with the decision but I would rather not comment further at this stage."

Mr Gainer is scheduled to arrive in April subject to being issued with a work permit.

Because of the controversy surrounding the issue an Extraordinary Directors meeting is scheduled for Tuesday

Cllr Summers ventures where angels fear to tread

THE quality of justice in the Falkland Islands has been questioned by no less than a Falkland Islands' elected representative.

In his Motion for Adjournment speech last Friday, Councillor Mike Summers commenting on justice in the Falklands said, "....I think those that are responsible for it need to think what they are doing." He qualified this saying, "I think

by and large it is a good justice system.

However, Councillor Summers appeared to accept he was raising a controversial issue by saying he was going, ... "where angels fear to tread.

Picking up on the recent trial of two officers from the Royal Falkland Islands Police, he slammed the justice system for exacerbating the "devastating effect" such trials have on the accused's family and friends as a result of delays. He said, "So I would ask those

involved in future cases of the sort, or entirely different cases, to think about what you are doing when you are delaying things and putting things off because it is not convenient.

More disturbingly Councillor Summers revealed, "...on a number of occasions I had to remind some pretty senior people in government, including two pretty senior people in Government House that the objective of the government on the terms of the police trial is not to achieve a conviction, but to achieve justice.

A spokesperson for Government House said the Governor, Alan Huckle has not yet taken a decision on whether to respond to Cllr Summers' comments.

SPORTS fever has swept the Islands for another year leaving in its wake a group of tired. exhilerated and somewhat dazed individuals that have experienced the phenonemon of a week at North Arm or Port Howard, celebrating the end of the farming season.

North Arm was guinea pig this year for a two day race programme and while I was not able to be there for the second day I listened avidly to the commentary from Patrick Watts and had to admire the hardiness of both the jockeys and spectators for keeping going in the most adverse weather conditions and still managing to have a damn good time. But that is the nature of Islanders in general - if we let the weather stop us doing things it would be a rather dull life we would lead.

Now, while I could never be accused of being a bra-burning woman's libber, I have often observed how Falklands women are a particularly resourceful bunch in general - I know plenty who could train a dog, ride a horse and dig a post hole, all before breakfast - and I was filled with pride at the revelation from the census that in the Falklands there are more women than men in professional employment. Pass me those matches, girls!

It is maybe that unique ability to multi-task that has helped women forge ahead and I have to tell you I saw a fantastic example of that at North Arm on Sunday.

Clicking away madly with my camera I noticed Ron Binnie walking from the stables with a horse geared up to race. Odd, I thought, Ron usually rides up. He carried on past me and stopped opposite his daughter Micheles' burger van. Apron flung in corner and hard hat hastily shoved on her head Michele jumped out of the van, leapt on *Shyre* shot down to the start, galloped up to take third place and was back in the van in time to turn the burgers over and continue to feed the multitudes queuing for food... I rest my case.

HOWEVER, the feel good factor about women's status in the Falklands was pretty quickly nipped in the bud by the news that a Falkland Islands woman who has probably done more for tourism in the last twelve years (having trained specifically) than any other individual, has been turned down for the position as General Manager of Tourism in favour of an overseas applicant. Personally I don't think there is anyway the sort of experience gained in the Islands can be imported.

Now, I don't know what sort of advice they are handing out to youngsters at the 'Falklands career office' but I hope students are not being told that if they study and work hard, promote their country at every opportunity and help to build up what is one of the Islands fastest growing industries, that they will do well - because that is certainly not the case here.



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Executive Council roundup Aviation proposals approved

EXECUTIVE Council has approved two proposals made by the Director of Civil Aviation.

The first recommended that FIGAS be subject to regulatory charges for Personnel Licensing, Aircraft Nationality and Registration Marks and Aircraft Accident and Incident Investigation.

The new Air Navigation (Fees for Certificates and Services) Regulations 2006 allowed the Falkland Islands Civil Aviation Department (FICAD) to introduce fees to the industry and begin to generate revenue for services provided, explained Cllr Rendell.

He said when these fees were approved, FIGAS was exempted from any charges.

"Members were advised that if the recommendation was accepted internal transfers between FIGAS and FICAD would create an additional administration burden," said Cllr Rendell.

"It was however agreed that on balance it was important to show the true operating costs of FIGAS and allow FIG to demonstrate to Air Safety Support International (ASSI) that FICAD is generating as much revenue as possible." He added, "If FICAD is to achieve full designation the additional revenue received would be able to allocate additional regulatory resource, thus speeding up the process. The second proposal recommended that the total cost of travel, accommodation, audit, report and man hours be recovered from organisations requesting a certificate in accordance with the Air Navigation (Overseas Territories) Order 2001.

Cllr Rendell said that in particular FICAD has to plan and carry out audit functions in relation to one of the conditional designations, 'Safe Transport of Dangerous Goods by Air.' He said members agreed that the "user pays" policy should be followed, "...rather than FICAD being funded from FIG funds.

More funding for meat company in 2007

A PROPOSAL seeking additional funding of £217K for this financial year for the Falkland Islands Meat Company was approved and referred to Standing Finance Committee in Executive Council (ExCo).

Cllr Mike Rendell said that considerable discussion took place on the subject, and while members recognised that a large proportion of the operating costs finds its way back in to the farming economy, "...there was a clear recognition of the need to identify possible cost reductions."

A number of options were considered and will be passed to FIMCo for further discussion.

Additional costs have arisen partly because of the planned separation from FIDC, and partly from overstatements in 2007 export volumes and prices and in local meat sales revenue, said CIIr Rendell.

Falklands' women on top

- Patterns shown by the 2006 census

WOMEN now outnumber men in professional occupations in the Falkland Islands, according to a report on the 2006 Census.

The report produced by the Acting Attorney General, Ms Ros Cheek, which records census patterns, notes that more women than men work in professional, technical and related categories of employment in the Falkland Islands.

We are still not an entirely nonpatriarchal society, however, as a male is still far more likely to be identified as head of household than a female - 65.78% of heads of household are male.

The likelihood increases if the male is married, however, this pattern may be changing, because women under 30 are more likely than their male counterparts to be identified as head of household.

Employment

Overall the employed population is made up of 53.95% male and 46.05% female, "...confirming the trend in increased participation, and therefore the economic importance, of women in employment," comments Ms Cheek

The report also notes that unemployment figures do not appear to show an increase.

Population count

According to the report the population of the Falkland Islands excluding persons connected with the military garrison is now 2,478, showing an increase of 4.16% since 2001

Camp population

continues to decline, reducing from 390 to 361 since 2001. However, the decline appears to be coupled with an ageing of the population.

Males continue to outnumber women, both in Stanley and in Camp, but the percentage difference narrows from 51.16% to 50.85% between 2001 and 2006.

Immigration

The rate of immigration appears to be slowing, says Ms Cheek and, "The population born in the Islands continues to rise.

The proportion of the population born in the United Kingdom and St. Helena continues to be significant (total at 31.90%) and the next significant population by place of birth is of persons born in Chile.

The diversity of the community is highlighted by another new question in the census with 25 different languages other than English spoken in households in the Islands, although most numbers of other language speakers are small, except Spanish, which is spoken at home by 227 persons. House ownership

There are now 783 houses in Stanley, an increase from 2001 of 93 houses. House ownership continues to increase and household occupancy rates show a continuing trend of under occupation with little overcrowding.

Education

The trend towards a more educated population continues with persons with recognised external examinations at secondary level increasing from 955 (40.14% of the population) in 2001 to 1033 (41.69% of the population) in 2006.

Vehicles

The number of vehicles in Stanley continues to increase from 1,054 in 2001 to 1264 in 2006. Four wheel drive vehicles continue to rise in popularity

Computers

Computer numbers in Stanley have now increased to 74.01% of households, with internet access not far behind in 64.62% of households.

Computer numbers in Camp have increased to 118, making up 63.10% of households, with internet access in 58.28% of households

£400 fine for driver

STANLEY man Melvyn Clifton received a fine of £400, and was ordered to pay prosecution costs, in court on Wednesday, after pleading guilty to driving without a vehicle licence.

Principal Crown Counsel Ms Ros Cheek described how in the early hours of February 1, police officers had reason to stop Mr Clifton's vehicle; and it was established the vehicle's licence had expired on December 2.

Mr David Lang, representing Mr Clifton, said his client had changed his original plea from not guilty as he was not prepared to plead guilty to the original charge which claimed the offence had occurred on February 1. The charge was amended in court to read January 31. Mr Lang said when Mr Clifton was stopped by police he was not driving but had been drinking, so to have pleaded guilty to committing the offence on February 1 would have been admitting drink driving as well.

Driving conviction

A young male was given a conditional discharge for six months in the youth court on Friday after he admitted to a charge of driving without a vehicle licence.

Gold rush cancelled

FALKLAND Gold and Minerals Ltd (GFML) lost its shine on Wednesday as the group said no results of economic value have been found to date.

At the companies AGM, chairman Richard Linnell said during the year to January 31 2007, 11,462 metres were drilled, with 20,539 metres out of the 24,000 planned already completed.

"Despite the extensive work programme having significantly in-creased the company's knowledge of the Islands' geology and the source of anomalies, no results of economic value have been found to date," he added.


The company expects that the remaining drilling programme will be completed by the end of June this year at which time it will review the viability of any further work. London (Sharecast)

battle for Cup

THE 2007 Darwin Harbour Sports Association race meeting will be remembered for an outstanding Governor's Cup clash between the two finest horses around.

Zafonic (Croacia/Dancing Brave), ridden by owner Tim Bonner and Dashing Dancer (Pollerita/Thver), owned by Maurice Davis and ridden by Arthur Turner, gave race-goers, who braved the wet and windy conditions at North Arm, a finish to remember.

Dashing Dancer, the winner last year at Goose Green, was away quickly at the whistle and seemed to have established an unbeatable lead. However Tim Bonner urged on his ever-improving 2005 Stanley Governor's Cup champ, and closed the gap as the winning post loomed. With two strides to go it seemed Zafonic had the lead by a nose, but within a stride of the post it appeared as if Dashing might be a whisker ahead it was that close. Perhaps a dead-heat would be called, but after considerable deliberation and discussion the judges announced in favour of Zafonic. Arthur Turner tabled an objection to the result but the stewards, after a quickly convened meeting, decided that the judges decision would and should stand.

The battle between these two magnificent young horses typified all the excitement, enjoyment and competition that horse-racing has brought to the Falklands during the past 130 years or more.


There was expectation of a repeat run in a later event but it was not to be, so now racing enthusiasts will presumably have to wait until the 2007 SSA meeting at Christmas to see these two champions oppose each other.

Earlier in the meeting Dashing Dancer had romped away with the Cable & Wireless Trophy, repeating last years victory at Goose Green. The thoroughbred went on to take the F.I.C. Cup. the Lafonia Plate and the F.G.M.L. Champion Cup F.I.B for the second year succession.

Zafonic, the first F.I. Bred horse to win the Maiden Plate and Governor's Cup at the same meeting in 2005. looked as if he would go through the racecard unbeaten, chalking up wins in the Owner's Up (where the jockey has to be the owner) and the Nick Taylor Memorial Challenge Trophy. However it was inexplicable that in a two-horse race for the Cantera Open Challenge Cup, one horse (*Zafonic*) appeared to be standing side-on when the starting whistle was blown. Arthur Turner understandably continued up the course on *Papina* to record a 'victory'=

In the traditional opening event, William Goss' mount Pasha ran away with the Maiden Plate winning by 100 yards, in a 3 horse race. Unfortunately the big black animal, a latecomer to the racing scene, went lame and was withdrawn from further events. Later in the Bowles Trophy, in a battle between the two other Maiden Platers, Lauren McKay's Starbright, ridden by Arthur Turner beat the Mike Evans owned Riverdance (Stefan Clarke).


There were few entries in most of the Open races, which allows the imported Chilean horses to compete. *Papina* took the Stand Chartered Chase for Maurice Davis while his *Fonto Blanco*, ridden by Arthur Turner, comfortably

Ron Binnie's bounding mare Shyre (Sheba/Thyer) enjoyed considerable success under Michelle Evans guidance, winning the Stanley Services Stakes and Fitzroy Cup. Meanwhile the foal of another famous past champion, Eric Goss' Thylinda (Lucinda/ Thyer) ridden by Tim Bonner, edged out Thyroid and Clanny's Cruiser in the Triangle Y Chase, and went on to capture the F.I.B. 400 yards. The 'hat-trick' was completed when Hayley Bonner



Youngsters Duane Evans and Stefan Clarke, both now competing at senior level, showed considerable maturity and skill, as they took on the more experienced jockeys and although not recording any major victories obtained some notable placings.

The Rincon Grande bred Serendipity, a Maiden Plater at Goose Green a year ago, gave Arthur Turner an excellent win in the Smylies Farm prize and had several other placings.Elaine Turner returned to the course, steering Fonto Blanco first past the post in the F.I.C. Ladies Gallop.

Three teenage jockeys Eva Velasquez, Rebecca Lowe and Macauley Davis enjoyed friendly rivalry during the 5 events programmed for their age group. Eva, riding her father Oscar's wellknown *Butterfly* won on four occasions, beating Macauley on *Miami Lance* by half a length each time. But in the final clash of the day, Macauley turned the tables with a determined ride that saw him home by a good margin.

Robert McAskill and his wife Tracy had a friendly battle in the Consolation race with 'Rags' edging ahead at the post on *Minihoma*.

The Champion Jockey competition was yet another 'head to head' between the Governor's Cup opposing jockeys Tim Bonner and Arthur Turner. Fortunes fluctuated throughout and at the final count it was Tim with 37 points to Arthur's 34 who took the title.

Nick Rendell beat Stephen Dickson and Lucas Berntsen in the 100 yards foot event, but Duane Evans edged out all three to win the 220. Youngster Declan Bonner triumphed in the 440 and 880.

Darwin Harbour officials experimented with a two-day race/ gymkhana/foot meeting for the first time in the 129 years of sports meetings. Unfortunately heavy rain caused the postponement of events after lunch on the first day, but all the major races were completed in a packed second day when 70 m.p.h gale force winds were recorded.

How big an impact on the family is smoking? It is clear to me that an alcoholic affects everybody around themselves; indeed alcohol-



We continued on to Estancia House and the kindness of Falkland Islanders was again evident as the Heathman family stopped on the road and offered us food. That

Fortunately I did not have far to go to locate the people I wanted to meet. I first located Peter Biggs and his charming wife. They directed me to the house of Elizebeth (Goss) Elliot who was taking a bath at the time, (sorry Liz). But her husband did get her to sign my book.

The third gent was John Fowler who I found busy on a computer with his son, who he tells me was due to be born at the time of the raids. Unfortunately the fourth gent Joe King, I was informed had passed away, which I was saddened to hear. But three signatures in my book I

found to be an achievement, thank you all concerned.

To close, I would like with his permission to relay the last two passages from the Captains Log on the visit to the Falkland Islands.

"The Globe Tavern with it's 'Endurance' red roof, the whalebone arch outside the Cathedral and the white picket fencing was as I had expected, what I had not expected however, was the considerable amount of four wheeled drive vchicles racing about, with less than 2000 people living in Stanley I gained the impression that some locals were not particularly pedestrian friendly.

"The local tourist board promotes a welcome to 'one of the world's best kept secrets'. Unfortunately. I think no longer is that correct, in fact passenger ships with over 2,500 passengers is scheduled to arrive tomorrow. There is a special beauty with these islands that will undoubtedly be lost if the Islanders themselves do not realise that it is the very feeling of isolation that should be maintained, and that they should not, in my veiw, exploit that isolation for short term gain.

I would think this sums up the thoughts of those of us that visited a wonderful and unique untouched part of the world which is still part of Britain, which is unfortunately falling apart. God bless you all.

San Aspiring catches world's largest squid

A NEW Zealand fishing boat has landed what is believed to be a world record squid weighing in at an estimated 450 kilos (990lbs).

The gigantic sea creature is about 10 metres (33 feet) long and about 150 kilos heavier than the next biggest specimen ever found.

The fishing vessel San Aspiring was long lining in the Ross Sea near Antarctica, and the squid was dining on a hooked toothfish when it was hauled up from the deep.

He just appeared as a great, big dark shape coming out of the depths. He was wrapped around a 30 kilo toothfish and was munching away on it," the ship's captain, John Bennett said.

"The squid probably latched onto the toothfish at a depth of 1,800 metres," he added.

New Zealand Fisheries Minister Jim Anderton, said the colossal squid had been frozen and would be preserved for scientific study.

"It is likely that it is the first intact adult male colossal squid to ever be successfully landed. The scientific community will be very interested in this amazing creature. Mr Anderton said, describing the squid as "...one of the most mys-terious creatures in the deep ocean." Wellington AFP

Fisheries celebrate 20th anniversary

Stanley hosts a fisheries open day Send a clear message on human rights



ALWAYS a busy area, FIPASS, the floating dock to the east of Stanley was alive with visitors and looking very festive with flags fluttering from the three ships alongside on Saturday.

A trawler, longliner and jigger were open to the public to tour, explore and enjoy the harvest of their labours in buffet form.

With the first fishing zone around the Islands declared in October 1986 and the fishing licence regime coming into force in February 1987 the fishing industry was celebrating its 20th anniversary.

Falklands waters are noted for their squid with production account-ing for around 75% of annual catches of some 200,000 tonnes.

In good years the revenue from the sale of fishing licenses has been as high as $\pounds 20 - \pounds 25$ million.

Protecting the zone from poachers are aircraft and an armed fishery protection vessel while ensuring conservation targets are achieved by controlling the number of vessels licenced to fish in the zone.

The trawler Robin M Lee was at FIPASS and hosted a great many people who had never had the opportunity to step on board a fishing vessel

"We were very pleased to be able to have the *Robin M Lee* alongside FIPASS for the day," said Director of Seafish, Hamish Wylie. "Seafish hold 70% of the loligo quota for her, and with 260 people here with a financial interest in her, it is nice to be able to have a chance to let our shareholders see that we are looking after their investment.

This also applies to the longliner CFL Gambler which was at FIPASS. "A lot of people commented on the cleanliness of the factory decks, and of course as a place where food is being handled and processed, it is

very important that the areas are kept clean, not just on an open day, but all year round," he said.

Talking about the loligo fishery, Mr Wylie said it is an example of what can be achieved in other fisheries

"FIG revenue from fishing licences is less than half what it was in real terms 18 years ago, and the only opportunity for gaining more from the fishery, is for the Islands to be part of it instead of skimming off the top.

The future

Mr Wylie said the creation of property rights in the fishery is just the first step, "... in enabling us to make the fishery more profitable through efficiency, and to enable long-term investment to take place.

He says an adequate port that will enable product to come ashore and be sorted and graded hefore heing sold by electronic auction to world markets, and shipped direct to the customer by the container load is key to keeping more of the profit from the fishery in the Islands.

"With the increase in fuel costs, and the advent of cost effective wind power, we should be able to operate cold stores here as cheaply as anywhere else in the world, he said.

"We spend millions of pounds a year on inter-seasonal vessel maintenance, most of which could be carried out here with some basic facilities. The fishing industry will provide a whole range of employment opportunities that would spring up around a proper dock. Benefiting from the fishery is not just keeping the profit here, but keeping a good slice of the expenditure here as well."

CHAIR of Consolidated Fisheries. Cheryl Roberts also owns Beauchene Fishing Co Ltd along with her husband Peter, and has been involved in the fishing industry for more than 15 years.

She is one of several Falklands women who have built their careers in a largely male dominated industry, but says it has never been an issue.

"In Stanley there are quite a number of us and I know and work with quite a few women in the industry outside the Islands, some of whom hold high powered positions."

The Industry at sea is still predominantly male, although on merchant vessels that differs slightly, ...maybe on fishing vessels one day that'll be the case also," said Mrs Roberts

"Working in this industry is diverse, challenging, rewarding and gives the opportunity to meet a lot of interesting people from crew of vessels through to the people who



make the decisions that could affect industry, here in the Islands and abroad.

Mrs Roberts does have some concerns regarding human rights issues onboard some fishing vessels licensed to fish in Falklands waters. ...not However, she hastens to add." all vessels, and I think that is important for people to understand.

She says that whilst it would no doubt be extremely difficult to legislate she would like to see it being included as a condition of licence.

Quite how to implement and carry it out would need further discussion but in the meantime I suggest it would send a hard and clear message to those that appear to have a complete disregard towards their fellow human beings.

Co-operation between companies is growing

FORTUNA Ltd was one of the first fishing companies to become established in 1987

Stuart Wallace is one of the founding members of the company. that has branched out into a vari-

ety of businesses in the Falklands. A high point for Fortuna was their first shareholding in fishing vessels. "We became owners of the Petrel in 1991 and went on to bring other vessels into the group in sub-sequent years," said Mr Wallace.

1996 was an extremely sad year for Fortuna when John Cheek, a fellow founder of the company died.

Around 2002 the price of squid plummeted which was, "...a low point for all concerned," said Mr Wallace

The new Fisheries Law has transformed the environment in which we work, he says " ...already co-operation between Falklands seafood companies is growing and that will greatly benefit the economy in time to come.

There is strength in unity of purpose. Falkland companies will need to deal with the current lack of infrastructure and facilities on the road to developing the fishery. this needs to be done in partnership with our government and for our part we very much look forward to participating in the continuing de-velopment of our sector."

Do plovers and dotterels stay for the winter?

DO plovers and dotterels stay at home or go travelling over winter?

British PhD student James St Clair has completed the first of three summers studying two-banded plovers and rufous-chested dotterels on Sea Lion Island. Now back in his University of Bath office, he is wondering whether the banded birds will stay on Sea Lion Island or migrate northwards to East Falklands or clsewhere.

"Similarly sized white-rumped sandpipers arrive in the Falklands in September from the Arctic, so plovers and dotterels should be able to travel large distances and move from island to island," explained James.

"Over the summer, the banded birds on Sea Lion Island stayed fairly close to where they were nesting, but over winter, no one knows if they stay or move to different feeding grounds," says James. "If you see a banded plover or dotterel away from Sea Lion Island, I'd love to hear about it."

James asks that you record the date, location, species and combination of the colour rings. The study birds have four bands, with the



bottom right band being metal. Record first the colour of the bottom left band, then the top left band and lastly, the top right band.

"Colour rings can be difficult to read," says James. "But if you see a colour-ringed bird but cannot read the colours or sequence of rings, please make a note of this and submit the record anyway."

Reduce injuries and deaths at sea Clausen: Proud to be involved in fisheries Cllr Davies: Look after Cape Pembroke Road gangs need new machinery

"OUR economy relies on our fishery are provisions for checking safety and we are rightly proud of the way that we manage it in a sustainable and effective manner, but we shouldn't forget that this wealth relies on the labour of hundreds of men working on the ships over the horizon " Conneillor Dr Richard Davies has warned.

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"Anyone who has ever been onboard a jigger will know what the conditions are like on many of them. They are not all bad but some of them are pretty grim. They have small cabins, are overcrowded, not much food. long working hours, and fresh water and washing facilities are extremely limited '

Cllr Davies described the sea around around the Falklands as, "A harsh and unforgiving, dangerous environment," adding that life is going to be hard on the best managed ships. "Nevertheless, young men from poor countries get a living and we get our fishery," he said.

"What is intolerable is that we get cases where men have been tied up, imprisoned, beaten and otherwise abused. And it is also intolerable that life is made worse by unsafe working practices and lack of basic safety equipment, which would cost little or nothing to correct.

"At the beginning of this week, as you all know, on the eye of the 20th anniversary of our fishery, ten young men jumped off a Taiwanese jigger into the harbour in an attempt to swim ashore. Two of them didn't make it and are missing, presumed dead. I am given to understand that they were either non-swimmers or weak swimmers. They didn't wear life jackets so one can understand the desperation that drove them to jump into our bitterly cold water.

Cllr Davies said he saw the survivors in hospital, describing tham as, ...bright, pleasant, courteous and grateful people mourning the death of their two sea-mates."

He thanked the emergency services and those that responded at the time of the incident.

"It's extremely commendable that FIG takes a robust stance when flagrant human rights violations come to light as we did in 1998 with the case of the In Sung 101. Criminal instance which occur within our territorial waters must be dealt with by the force of law and, it is commendable that we can afford to be moderately generous with medical treatment and repatriation where the costs can't be recovered.

"But I would ask if this is enough. I don't believe that there is any thread of consistent concern to pro-actively protect human rights in the fishing fleet. Although individuals are concerned about the issue, there doesn't appear to be any great enthusiasm for investigating the core problem or taking effective and pro-active action. It is true that international law makes it difficult to respond effectively to instances which occur in our zone but outside our territorial waters.

"Some progress has been made in that the new Falkland Islands Licensing Ordinance has been broadened to include basic safety standards so, there

equipment as part of license conditions. This is a step forward but we do need to make sure that it is properly implemented"

'What can be done to reduce the toll of death and injury in the fleet?" asked Cllr Davies.

"If we are to improve the situation, we need a clear idea of the working conditions and accident rates. Most of what we know is piecemeal and anecdotal as this week's Penguin News editorial point out. It occurs out of sight and over the horizon. I would put it to you that making a distinction between non accidental injuries. between beatings and these very gross violations of human rights that we have seen from time to time, distinguishing them from the instances of this complete lack of proper safety precautions, is perhaps less important than trying to reduce the instance of injuries and deaths in general."

He said some of what goes on is known and most of the injuries are the result of accidents rather than attacks, however he said, these can in themselves can be violations of human rights.

"The majority of them appear to me to be entirely preventable and to rise from the appalling safety standards and a very casual attitude to human life and health, in some parts, of the fishing fleet. And I would stress some parts.

"We hear about sea anchors parting, causing some of the severe injuries we see in the hospital and it's said that these lines are in often very poor condition. We see men with head injuries where squid blocks have fallen on their heads during transhipping and they haven't been wearing hard hats. And one has to compare the costs of one night's stay in hospital and a launch trip against the cost of fitting out a crew with proper hard hats ... Improvements cost nothing. We see men with frostbite on their hands from working too long in the freezer holds - it's a simple matter to consider shorter shifts and higher turnovers, so they don't get frostbite.

There are things we can look at and these are not the rambling of a bleeding heart liberal. I think there are good reasons for us to do something more proactive."

"If we do lose the occasional revenue so be it," said Cllr Davies, adding that his belief is, "...as long as the souid come into our waters, the ships are going to follow and it is overfishing and climate change that threatens the fishery, not the defence of human rights."

"In summary I would say that progress could be made at relatively little cost by perhaps for example developing a voluntary accident prevention programme perhaps with some judicious incentives. I would like to suggest that we celebrate our 20th anniversary of the fishery not only with our record of a well managed fishery but with a determination to take a more proactive approach to the welfare of the men who bring in our revenue.'

COUNCILLOR Dr Andrea Clausen chose to talk about the history and progress of fisheries as the industry began celebrations to mark the 20th anniversary of the first fishing license regime.

She said she felt very proud to be involved and to stand to speak about it.

Cllr Clausen said when she left school she went to work in the newly established Fisheries Department which was in, "...dodgy Porta Cabins" near the sea wall where a very young John Barton (now Director of Fisheries) was employed as a fisheries scientist.

She said that since becoming established the fishery has exceeded initial expectations. "...while contributing a couple of million to the economy

"It was very rewarding to hear last night at a public presentation that, in terms of at least Government revenue, the fishery had contributed in excess of £400 million to date over the last 20 years.

"I think we have to comment on the very careful fiscal policy that we have had in place, which has allowed us not only to invest in our infrastructure and our services and to provide the community at large with a reasonably high standard of living, but has also allowed us to build security in terms of the investments we now have, which amounts to a little over half of that total."

Cllr Clausen said that in terms of the way the fishery has developed from a Government prospective, in

"One of the key goals of the system is to maximise local control. We have 100% ownership and I think it's very rewarding to see how the private sector has grown and responded to the policies of the day."

Comments have been made by the public, "...who don't know what the fishery has done for them," said Cllr Clausen. "I find it amazing they would think like that considering the high standard of living they enjoy today that is a result in some way to that fishery."

Referring to a presentation on the fishery on Thursday she said she would like to see it given again, perhaps later this year and bring in some more of the public.





Page 12 Legislative Council: Questions for oral answer

COUNCILLOR lan Hansen asked the Honourable Richard Cockwell if he could assure the house that the road to the west of Port Howard settlement is complete in construction to enable heavy goods ve-hicles access to the proposed ferryhead on West Falklands at any time? If not, could he indicate what further work needs to be undertaken and the estimated cost?

Councillor Richard Cockwell responded saying the road to the West of Port Howard was constructed along similar lines to the rest of the Camp track network with the basic specification being, "...a road suit-able for light four wheel drive vehicles all year round.

This section of road along with most of the Camp track network will be limited to a maximum of fifteen tons during the winter months, that is most likely to be from the end of April to the beginning of Oc-tober depending on the particular weather conditions.

He said the first objective to improve access to the West ferry-head is considered to be to cap the road from Port Howard to Harps farm, a process that will take a fully geared up team approximately one season. The order of cost is likely to be £300.000.

"These works on West Falkland have not yet been programmed as capping is currently being concen-trated on the MPA road and to be followed by sections of the North Camp track on East Falkland," Cllr Cockwell said. He added, "...usage of unsurfaced

roads is always going to be weather dependant and even once capping has been carried out this will continue to be the case.

Grazing and infill plots Councillor Janet Robertson asked Councillor Richard Davies to advise whether the current policy of infill plots takes any account of plots used for grazing horses in Stanley, and whether a plan for providing grazing plots, as opposed to grazing rights on the Common exists?

Councillor Davis said the current policy of encouraging the development for housing of privatelyowned infill plots within Stanley does not take into account grazing issues: it is not anticipated that infill plots suitable for such development would be used for horse-grazing other than on a very infrequent and short-term basis

The Lands Committee is currently reviewing several areas of Government-owned land within Stanley which may be released for housing development if their release does not impact unfavourably on green space provision within the town.

Only one of the areas being considered by the Lands Committee is currently used for horse-grazing. This area is a ten acre plot near the junction of Sapper Hill and Bypass Roads. It was advertised for housing development in early 2006. but no bids were received. This area is adjacent to, but not part of, Stanley Common and is currently used for horse-grazing as part of the Common," Councillor Davis explained

He said that Executive Council have also invited officers to consider whether a further four acre plot currently leased by Government as a private grazing plot (near the

old butchery) could be considered for housing development, but at present this does not form part of the Lands Committee's review.

No proposals have been put forward for the creation of grazing plots. rather than grazing rights, on Stanley Common, said Cllr Davies, adding, "...anyone interested in leasing a grazing plot from Government should consult the Attorney General's office at Malvina Gardens in the first instance. Anyone interested in graz-ing their horse on Stanley Common should contact the Department of Agriculture.

Cllr Robertson asked for clarification as to whether there are areas that people could apply for, to use

for grazing plots. Cllr Davies said that as far as he recollected some of the grazing plots which were tendered a few months ago had not been taken up. If somebody identifies a plot that belongs to government and could be used for grazing they should make enquiries at the Attorney General's office. This however does not apply to areas of the common which cannot be fenced off

Councillor Summers said that there is a list of plots available for application for grazing and include the triangle. He asked where this alleged policy of infill plots can be referred to: has it been approved by ExCo as an amendment to the town plan; was it widely discussed in the planning committee and has there been any public consultation about the issue of infill plots, adding, "I know large numbers of the commu-nity are concerned at the extent of infill plot development or over development

Cllr Davies said he did not think the triangle was part of the areas available for grazing because it is currently administered by government House with the permission of the government. Regarding the infill plots

policy it is fair to say it has been widely publicised and discussed as part of the draft housing strategy although it has not been formally ratified by ExCo.


Cllr Summers asked it was not a current policy and Cllr Davies confirmed that it is part of the draft housing strategy.

Clir Robertson asked if, when devising the infill plots whether sites were identified with permission of the owners or whether some owners may find part of their property designated as a potential infill plot without them being aware of it

A study was done by the Envi-ronmental Planning Department identifying more than 200 infill plots about 18 months ago, said Cllr Davies.

This was not done with the owners consent, quite a large number of those plots would not currently be suitable and some have come before the Planning and Building Committee for outline planning permission and development and been refused.

It seemed to me that it was a reasonable exercise to take to get a feel for the potential number of plots available in Stanley... but does not imply that owners will have to release it or that any pressure will be applied to do so -far from it." he said

Wool market report for week ending February 23 By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

FOR THE week ending February 23, greasy wool prices generally traded at levels within several pence per kilogram clean of last weeks values. The main exceptions to this were 23 and 24 micron fleece wool tots which fell in value by 5 and 10 pence per kilogram respectively.

Closing prices for each micron "Micron Price Guide" table. The AWEX "Eastern Market In-dicator" (EMI) finished the week

down marginally at 367.6 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 368.7 pence per kilogram clean.

In key wool selling countries, well prepared, stylish, low VM, higher staple strength lots were in considerably higher demand than average and poorer style lots. As an example of this trend, 23 micron fleece wool lots with a degree of tenderness and average style, traded at discounts of approximately 15 pence per kilogram clean below similar micron lots of good style and staple strength.

Excessive staple length also continues to attract significant market discounts. The discount is most pronounced for finer lots. The discount ranges from 20 pence per kilogram clean for 18 micron fleece wool. 15p/kg clean for 19 micron fleece wool, 12 p/kg clean for 20 micron fleece wool, 6 p/kg clean for 22 micron fleece wool and several pence per kilogram clean for 23 micron fleece wool lots. Staple length discounts are ap-

plied when staple length exceeds expected "norms" for a particular micron category. For Falkland Is-lands "finer" fleece wool types this

may start to have an impact as staple lengths exceed approximately 100mm. This issue should be discussed with your wool selling agent if wool type and/or time of shear-

ing vary from "normal". In South Africa 96% of the 6,949 bale offering was cleared. While in Australia only 88% of the 63,627 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the of-fering were 6,462 bales of crossbred wool of which 87% was sold.

Next week approximately 100.000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia.





A DIRECTOR of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board (FITB) has resigned over the decision announced last week to appoint an overseas candidate as General Manager.

However, at a Board meeting held on Tuesday, the decision taken by the interview panel -FITB directors Mike Rendell. Jennie Forrest and Mark Brunet to appoint Canadian Terry Gainer was upheld

John Fowler - himself a former General Manager of FITB - tendered his resignation from the Board as he disagreed with the decision to appoint Mr Gainer.

Falkland Islander Debbie Summers, Sulivan Shipping Ltd's Development Manager, also applied for the job.

In a letter to the Board, Mr Fowler commented, "Given that there was a well qualified local candidate, who has made an outstanding contribution to Falklands tourism and fitted exactly all the requirements of the post, as advertised, I believe and hope that there will be huge difficulties in the way of getting a work permit

Mr Fowler said that, in these circumstances, to appoint, "an from the unknown quantity outside, "with all the risks and expense involved," sends a clear message to young Falkland Islanders that, "...there is little point in aspiring to senior positions within this community.

He stated his intention to resign immediately after the decision to appoint Mr Gainer was announced, but was persuaded not to until after the directors' meeting held on Tuesday which, he said, "only served to confirm" this intention.

Mr Fowler said that despite urging from the Chair and other directors, the members present of the group charged with the recruitment process refused to explain their reasons behind the appointment in any "meaningful" detail.

"Such a refusal strikes me as a clear case of 'the tail wagging the dog' and without adequate explanation I cannot in all conscience be associated with the Board's decision to continue with the ap-pointment of Mr Gainer," Mr Fowler said.

Chairman of the Board, Councillor Ian Hansen confirmed that the decision to appoint Mr Gainer (subject to immigration procedure) was upheld but that the vote on the matter was, "not unanimous

He did not wish to make any further comment, "...because I feel it would be unfair on the applicants involved, for me to speculate on their abilities in the media.

However, he did add, "as a director of a company that is responsible to its members, I expect to hear much more from members on this issue?

Ten company members of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board have written to the directors to request they convene an Extraordinary General Meeting.

In the notice to the directors, they outline resolutions they intend to submit for consideration, including a vote of no confidence in the Board.

Licence implications for Jih Da Gan

THE government is taking steps towards revoking the licence of the Jih Da Gan, the Taiwanese-flagged jigger from which twelve men jumped when it was in Stanley Harbour last month.

Two of the men remain missing and are feared dead.

As reported in Penguin News last week, the police investigation into the incident, including interviews with the ten surviving crew members, was completed on Thursday, March I As a result, another crew member was arrested.

The police reported the following day that, after careful consideration, the prosecuting authorities had decided not to charge the arrested crew member with any criminal offences as, "...there was insuf-ficient evidence of any offences having occurred within Falkland Islands jurisdiction." The man was released from police bail and no further action was taken.

The government licence and logbooks were retrieved from the ship prior to its departure for the high seas. Councillor Richard Cockwell confirmed that notice of revocation had been issued upon the company, "....which means their li-cence is being revoked but they have a chance to respond before it is officially revoked.

He hoped this would help others to realise, "...we do not condone human rights abuses on fishing vessels in our waters.

Inspector Len McGill of the Royal Falkland Islands Police said the searches of the harbour continue to be carried out in an attempt to recover the two missing bodies.

He added, "Now that the decision has been made not to bring any prosecutions, the file will be completed and prepared so that it can be sent through Interpol to the country where the vessel is registered for the authorities there to do as they see fit.

I WAS lucky enough to get out of town for Sports Week and spend eight days driving around much of West Falkland. Towards the end of the week, while heading along the somewhat treacherous road to Port Stephens, listening to the FM radio reception fade in and out, the conversation in the vehicle wandered on to some of the rather unwittingly optimistic dialogue which has emanated from councillors over the past year or so.

Take, for instance, the discussion held last year in LegCo on the provision of a Bedford bowser to assist with fuel deliveries to West settlements; this came about as a result of the decision to stop deliveries by the *Tamar* to all West ports except to Fox Bay. Hill Cove and Port Howard. Councillor Clausen told the House the bowser was expected to be in service "soon". Months later it's not, but it was her sweeping suggestion that a bowser could be used which I felt demonstrated a lack of understanding of the situation.

I for one would not wish to be behind the wheel of any truck, let alone a bowser full of fuel, on that road to Stephens, for in places it is perilous. Travelling on it last week after the rain, at times the road was worryingly slippery and, in its steepest parts, really quite alarming - and that was just in a Land Rover. I hate to think what it will be like in a few months' time, particularly if the wet weather continues. I mean no disrespect to the road builders: the track will be much safer once it is capped, but given the commitments in place for the road gangs, this may take years.

As we slid from rut to rut 1 mused that it would be useful if all eight councillors spent a solid week driving around the West, not only experiencing the ferry and the roads, but hearing first hand the problems - and, importantly, solutions - people have. If nothing else, it could help provide a deeper knowledge and understanding - particularly for the town councillors - upon which to base their decisions.

Such a visit - not a roadshow - could help to close the gaping hole between the decision makers and those affected by their decisions.

THE Falklands Forum takes place in London next month, showcasing the Islands and - according to the official press release - "its promising commercial growth and investment prospects, particularly in the areas of oil and mineral exploration, fisheries, agriculture and tourism."

Debbie Summers is to lead the presentation on behalf of the Falkland Islands tourist industry, however, given the result of the recruitment process. I now wonder if she will still be willing to do this.

In London she will be held up as a Falklands success story someone who has been supported by our education system, who returned home committed to making a success of her industry and her country - and it seems rather hypocritical, given that she has been deemed unsuitable to manage the Falkland Islands Tourist Board, that she is still needed to give the presentation.

I expect that in the end her sense of loyalty to the Islands will outweigh any disappointment at missing out on the job and she will save the Falkland Islands the potential embarrassment of having the presentation given by someone who will have been here less than a month - but one could understand any reluctance she may have.

Thanks to all who submitted letters following the employment announcement from the Tourist Board last week, it's an important debate for us to have.

Kirchner promises another year of 'intense diplomacy'

ARGENTINA will not yield on its "legitimate aspiration" of recovering the Fatkland Islands and as in 2006, in 2007 it will be one of the main issues of the country's foreign policy, president Nestor Kirchner has said.

Addressing the National Assembly, before the joint session of the two Congressional Houses for the opening of the 125th legislature, Kirchner reiterated his administration's willingness to hold dialogue with the United Kingdom over sovereignty. He described Argentina's diplomatic actions regarding the Falklands issue in 2006 as "intense" and promised more of the same in 2007.

However he underlined that his government's decision to recover the exercise of sovereignty over the Islands is through, "peaceful means". In other Argentine news, Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez will lead a rally in a stadium in Buenos Aires today (Friday), when US President George W Bush arrives at the San Juan presidential residence estancia in Uruguay, only 60 kilometres away from the Argentine capital.

Dozens of activist groups are planning a protest at a Buenos Aires football stadium which can hold up to 40,000 people.

Jorge Ceballos, an Argentine activist who is organising the rally told local radio it is meant as an "alternative message" to US policies in the region.

"The United States is trying to block the expansion of Mercosur," said Ceballos, who also serves as deputy secretary at the Social Development Ministry. MP

Bugged by increasing earwigs Fairtrading at the Boathouse

EARWIGS appear to be a problem in the newer parts of town - in both East and West Stanley - with one homeowner reportedly killing 60 bugs in her home in one day.

Brian Summers, Invasive Species officer (see article page 5) says he has only heard "one or two" reports of the insects being found in older houses, but are widespread in gardens all over town.

He confirmed the bugs appear to be confined to Stanley, "...but 1 have had a report of them arriving on an island in a box of stores."

He added that there are several theories on how they arrived, ... the first batch certainly arrived in some sand imported for the building of the Goss Road houses for FIG

Mr Summers says he has been researching earwigs on the internet and has been sent information from the US and Canada, including an extensive list of chemical controls.

"Unfortunately I cannot find some of the products listed in the UK. I have sent several emails to one of the manufactures who do quite a range of products that are suitable for outdoor application but I have not had any reply.

Most products he has found in the UK, Mr Summers said, seem to be either sprays or powders which are no good for outdoor use. "I have found something called Dethlac which is a lacquer spray and is available from UK hardware shops including Robert Dyas.

A lot of people are using an automatic sprayer from Jimmy Forster at Bold Cove which seems to work, and it has been suggested that cutting up Vapona into strips and sticking it in corners around skirting boards may help, but the answer is to stop them getting into buildings. Keeping building matenals away from foundations will help

The Fire and Rescue Service has 'outgrown its facility'

THE Fire Service has outgrown the facility at Stanley fire station, "...they are making the best of what they have, but only 30% of the facility can be deemed as suitable or fit for purpose," says Christopher Gannon who has compiled a review of the Falkland Islands Fire and Rescue Service (FIFRS).

Mr Gannon said that compared to the Police Station, hospital and Defence Force facilities, "...it is quite clear that the FIFRS are operating in less appropriate conditions." He said in the case of the Defence Force he found the investment particularly surprising with so many military assets and facilities already established in the community.

Commissioned by the government Chief Executive Chris Simpkins, the report is the first independent review of the service since 1997 and was funded by the FCOS Overseas Territories Programme Fund.

The emergency services need to be, "...robust enough to effectively deal with the routine but also make a good attempt to deal with extraordinary events, which they face from time to time."

Mr Gannon says that during his brief time in the Islands it was obvious to him that the population is, "...hardy, independent and very self sufficient. "They are people who will actively assist themselves before complaining to the authorities about lack of attention and realize that the choice of living in remote locations in the Camp separates them, often by many miles, from services in Stanley."

Mr Gannon says the population will expect their national emergency services to do their very best within reason, "...and that is exactly the balance that FIG and FIFRS has to achieve."

The Fire Service answer 150-200 operational calls per year, not including FIG or non emergency requests for assistance. "This is actually an abnormally high figure when calculated against the size of the population and compared directly with local authority services in the UK," says Mr Gannon, adding that it is also higher than averages in some of the other Overseas Territories, illustrating the "...diverse nature and broad spectrum of responsibilities of the FIFRS."

Public perception of the fire service is "...usually very positive," said Mr Gannon, having sought opinion in and around Stanley.

"While the public admire the spectacle of shiny red vehicles responding at high speed and employing high-tech equipment in the course of their duties, they are rarely aware of the cost implications of providing a complete modern Fire and Rescue Service," he said.

On the subject of personnel, Mr Gannon says the Chief Fire Officer, as only one of three professional staff members in the service performs, "...far too many functions and micro-manages almost every aspect of the department..."

He says the fundamental fire safety and fire prevention obligations are being neglected, "...because of staff shortages.

"The FIFRS is currently managing to maintain its assets and provide effective operational response to the community, beyond that it is struggling to discharge any ancillary pro-active duties."

The review describes Chief Fire Officer Fiddes as a very dedicated, competent, forward thinking manager, who devotes a great deal of personal time and effort to ensure the effectiveness of the service.

"A slightly increased compliment of staff would give him the opportunity to demonstrate skills as a project manager and attend to technical projects such as the design and development of a new fire station and training facilities."

Mr Gannon advises that the Chief Fire Officer should enter into negotiations with medical executives to discuss potential improvements to ensure medical services arrive as soon as practically possible at incidents which involve joint emergency service response. While he said the report was not a review of the ambulance service, their ability to support the FIFRS promptly, particularly at road accidents, is highly "dubious" and was acknowledged by senior management at the hospital.

The review concludes with a number of recommendations that include:

• Publication of a citizens Charter to measure performance.

• Procurement of improved portable office space and storage building for airport and domestic sites.

• Urgent removal of current RIV Range Rover from service and procurement of an identical ex-military donor unit Land Rover variant.

• Development of a harbour/inland waterway marine rescue response.

 Improved liaison with Social Services and Environmental agencies for fire prevention activities.

 Recruitment of two full time officers to enable effective service delivery

• Direction on exact legal requrements for Stanley airport fire services.

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ONE in three of us could get a form of cancer at some stage during our life.

However the chances of a successful prognosis is greatly increased by the early detection of a cancer before it spreads and that is why the Falkland's Cancer Support and Awareness Trust has recently been proactive in exploring, in conjunc-tion with KEMH, the possibility of trying to introduce a breast cancer screening service in the Islands

The recent census shows that a significant percentage of the population could benefit from this service and that will undoubtedly grow. Unfortunately living in such a remote place has meant that only those who can afford to travel regularly or those sent after suspicious lumps have been found, have a mammogram undertaken.

Opinion does differ on the regularity one should have a mammogram: some are adamant that upon reaching the age of 40 an annual or bi-annual screening should take place, whilst others subscribe to the view that over 50 and every three years is appropriate. Both sides have arguments to back up their views but the basic fact is that regular breast cancer screening saves lives

Andy Brownlee (pictured) will bravely be attempting to run the forthcoming Stanley Marathon on behalf of the Cancer Support and Awareness Trust to help raise awareness and funds to make a con-



tribution towards this service and the work of the Trust in general, in supporting those already diagnosed with a cancer.

Andy was diagnosed with an aggressive form of throat cancer just 12 months ago, but due to its early detection was successfully treated and he is in remission and recovering well.

THIS month sees the local inception of the South Atlantic Invasive Species Project with the appointment of two project officers: one on the Falkland Islands and one on St Helena.

The European Commissionfunded project is being managed on behalf of the St Helena Government by the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds in the UK. Invasives are introduced species that have adverse ecological, economic or societal effects

The South Atlantic project will seek to identify the principal invasive species and will work with local partners to formulate an action plan for their future control or eradication. The project will run until September 2009

Brian Summers is the Falkland Islands, South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands project officer.

Brian is a Falkland Islander and his career to date has been in telecommunications, however he worked for the British Antarctic Survey on South Georgia and the Antarctic Peninsula during the 1970s

Brian's key interest is the Islands' wild flowers and he is looking forward to tackling thistles and other invasive plants that are slowly gaining a foothold on the Falklands. Another task of interest to the project is a feasibility study on the eradication of Patagonian foxes from several offshore islands.

Andrew Darlow, project officer for St Helena, Ascension and Tristan da Cunha is resident in St Helena. Originally from the UK, he has worked for the island's education department for the past six years. He will work on the ground in Ascension and St Helena with local agencies and directly with the very much isolated Tristan Conservation Department.

So what will the initial steps of the project be? Brian says, "One of our first tasks is to collect data. The South Atlantic Territories are not well represented in global environmental datasets."

The project team will initially work at a local level to establish baseline data on the principal invasive species on each island.

Project steering groups will be set up to encourage input and partnership from all interested parties. Strategies and techniques for the control or eradication of the invasives will be developed and scrutinised," Brian said. "These activities will lead to the development of an informed action plan for each territory to deal with those invasive species that are a priority for South Atlantic communities.

Your questions answered

Q HOW much was saved per annum when the holiday credit scheme was last cut, and how much has the abattoir subsidy increased in the last year?

A Financial Secretary, Derek Howatt provided the following information.

It is estimated that around £175,000 per annum will be saved from the latest reduction in accruals under the holiday credit scheme (outstanding accruals at 30 June 2006 amounted to £1,539,000).

The abattoir subsidy has increased by £102,000 in the last year (subsidy in respect of 2005/06 amounted to £615,000 and for 2006/07 it is estimated at $\pounds717,000$.

Q Why does a widow have to wait until she is 60 to receive what is called a 'widows pension'?

A Mr Nigel Dodd, Pensions Officer, provided this response.

Under the terms of the repealed Old Age Pensions Ordinance 1952 the widow of a contributor was entitled to a "state" pension at age 60, however a widower had to wait until 64 to receive any form of pension.

In January 1997 the Retirement Pensions Ordinance 1996 was enacted and this replaced the 1952 Ordinance. This new legislation allows both widows and widowers to receive a pension at age 60.

The use of the term "widow" or "widower" pension is merely used to define an individuals status at age 60 to allow them access to a pension four years earlier than the normal retirement age of 64. In exceptional circumstances an ex gratia (discretionary) pension may be awarded before age 60 or 64.

By definition a pension is a payment normally made 'in retirement' which, as indicated above, is paid either from age 60 or 64 and that the periods prior to these ages are considered to be part of an individual's normal working lifetime.



Is the debate about more than 'cronyism?'

I AM disappointed at the provocative headline ("Reconsider?") and intemperate language ("furious") used by Penguin News and Councillor Cockwell respectively in the article on the appointment of a General Manager to the Falkland Islands Tourist Board.

According to the diddle-dee telegraph there have been several senior jobs in the public sector in recent years for which local candidates have been rejected in favour of overseas candidates who are deemed to be better qualified or more experienced. This is the first occasion that a decision to appoint an overseas candidate has been described in the press as a "controversy" which is "causing consternation locally," or where a councillor has sought to exert overt polifical influence to overturn such a decision.

I would suggest that any recruitment decision made by an independent and experienced selection panel which has objectively and impartially weighed the merits of each candidate should not be open to review. If this is indeed the case here, then I hope the Directors of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board will support their colleagues' judgement

Councillor Ian Hansen, in his capacity as Chairman of the Falklands Tourist Board, is to be commended for commenting in an interview this eveningon FIRS that the only outcome he wants to see from Tuesday's meeting of the Directors is a united Board. I can only hope that political pressure is not brought to bear so that the Board unite to revoke the decision of the selecting panel (unless it can be shown that those involved in the selection process were not sufficiently objective and impartial).

If this row is about more than cronyism, and is intended to spark

a serious debate about how to develop the careers of young Falkland Islanders and reduce dependence on contract officers, then the time for discussion on secondment, job-shadowing, sabbaticals and the like is long overdue. However, such a debate should focus on the needs of public and private sector em-ployers and the benefits to the Falkland Islands generally, and not get embroiled in personalities or specific jobs

I would also argue that the overall tone of the article is unduly pessimistic. Councillor Cockwell expresses concern about the message the decision to appoint a contract officer in this case may send young people. There have been many talented Falkland Islanders appointed to promoted and professional posts within the public sector (and indeed in the private sector) in recent years, and no doubt Miss Summers will join their ranks in due course should she choose a public sector career.

With apologies for any errors or omissions, the following posts are now filled by Falkland Islanders, in many cases having previously been the exclusive preserve of contract officers:- Director of Public Works, Financial Controller of FIDC, General Manager of FIMCO, General Manager of FLH, Geography teacher, Laboratory Manager, Manager of the Museum and National Trust, Medical Officer, Physiotherapist, Plant and Vehicle Manager, Power Station Manager, Principal Crown Counsel. Taxation Officer, Veterinary Officer and Ward Sister.

The times they are a-changing, but the way ahead should be through advance planning and staff development, not through lobbying and pressurising when a decision properly made does not accord with popular sentiment. Name and address withheld

Training all in vain if employers do not utilise students skills

However with regards to apprentices I can assure you that they are all provided with the best opportunities to gain valuable experience and training to help them achieve their chosen qualification. All apprentices are given advice as to what they can achieve if they obtain their qualifications and work hard, however we cannot promise that they will have a job when they return as this will be the employers decision.

Remember, the Training Centre is solely providing the funding and training.

If we did not give appropriate advice and motivate apprentices to work hard then work would not be completed, qualifications not gained and apprenticeships terminated. Motivation plays a vital part in an apprenticeship, as with any job, without it the apprentice will struggle to complete work and will eventually spiral down hill with the possibility of being removed from the scheme.

Apprentices will be informed during the signing on stage as to what their options will be once they are qualified; again this is purely advice as the apprentice will have to make up their own mind. Occasionally when an apprentice is on a scheme the employer may find that they will make a future supervisor or manager and put them through further training, again this is down to the employer.

I do agree with you, however, that many private companies and FIG forget that we have a variety of qualified and experienced Islanders out there who are more than capable of undertaking higher up positions, just call me exhibit A!

Colder and wetter February than average

FEBRUARY was much colder and less sunny than average, with more rain and hail than normal.

The mean maximum temperature for February was 13.1 degrees. 2.1 below the long term average of 15.2C. The highest temperature recorded was 17.9C on the 22nd and the lowest maximum was 8.3C on the 19th

The mean minimum temperature was 5.5C, again below the long term average of 6.6C The lowest minimum was 2.1C on the 9th and the highest minimum of 10.1C was recorded on the 12^d

Rainfall was well above average for the month, with a total of 7 mm against the normal for February of 47.9 mm. The wettest day was the 17th with 11.9 mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 23 days and 1.0mm or more on 18 days.

There were no days when snow or sleet fell and seven days when hail was reported. No days of thunder and fog were reported. There were 135.6 hours of sun-

shine, less than the average of 185.9 hours. The highest daily total was 10.5 hours on the 4th. There was one day when no sunshine was recorded

The monthly mean wind speed was 16.1 knots, slightly above average for February.

The highest hourly mean speed of 44 knots occurred on the 12th and the highest gust of 59 knots, occurred on the 1st and the 12th

There were 16 days with gusts over 33 knots, which is average for the month.

Gales were recorded on eight days, above average for the month







By Karin Ingram DEREK HOWATT of Stanley has subscribed for many years to The Box and Fiddle, a magazine that I edit.

He approached me for advice about booking a Scottish dance band and caller/teacher who would be willing to travel down to the Falklands. Without hesitation I Falklands. Without hesitation I replied, "I'll do it, and I'll find you a band!"

Luckily. one of the broadcasting bands that I work with most frequently - The Glenelvan Scottish Dance Band was available with a little adjustment of dates and so the wheels were set in motion. There would be four of us - accordionist David Scott, his wife Judith Linton on fiddle, multiinstrumentalist Stuart Anderson and myself. Karin Ingram as dance teacher and caller.

Although we arrived about five hours behind schedule, the band decided to head for the Folk Club and play their allotted spot. Derek and Sue Howatt whisked us off and fed us first – Sue's cooking is out of this world, as we discovered during the rest of our stay.

Despite our tiredness we were able to appreciate the genuine warmth and friendliness of the people that we met at the club. We also enjoyed hearing the other musicians.

Unfortunately both David's and Stuart's accordions were damaged during the flight and although Stuart was able to effect a repair with chewing gum, David

was unable to use his MIDI that night.

Saturday was the big night the Burns Supper. The hall looked wonderful with a huge Saltire (Scottish flag) draped behind the stage and balloons in the same blue white everywhere. To and compensate for the loss of David's MIDI on his accordion it was decided that Stuart would play keyboards that night - if only they could steal a piano from somewhere! Shirley Adams-Leach came up trumps with an electric piano from the school music department. Graham and Martin, the sound and lighting guys, were excellent and seemed to know just what was needed.

The Burns Supper was great fun. Nick Hadden did the address to the haggis but had no knife to

plunge into it. I borrowed a "sgian dubh" from a gentleman in a kilt, who had a Scottish accent. During the break I asked him where he was from originally. "Och, it's just a wee village, you'll not have heard of it! It's called Denholm.' Denholm is ten miles from where I live - talk about a small world.

For me, the next day was the highlight of our trip - a visit to Volunteer Beach. When they say "off road" they really mean it, don't they? Our guide, Patrick Watts, was fantastic, very knowledgeable and interesting. While we were walking over to the beach Stuart managed to put his foot down a penguin's burrow. He spent the rest of the day worrying that he had destroyed its home.

When it came time to leave 1 tried to persuade the others to go back to Stanley and just leave me sitting amongst the Gentoo penguins, but I was dragged kicking and screaming back to the car!

Patrick was stuck with us the next day too. This trip was very different. We retraced the steps of the Scots Guards when they took Tumbledown Mountain extremely poignant and dramatic. There is a very well-known tune called The Crags of Tumbledown Mountain which was familiar to all of us, and it felt quite eerie to actually be there.

I left with a totally different perception and a пеw understanding of the war and the feelings of the Falkland Islanders.

Something that really impressed us during our stay was the enthusiasm of the young people for the dance and music. We had a fantastic time in the schools (a big thank you to Year 1 for the lovely card you made for us) and it was great that some of the young musicians were able to join us on stage for the Family Ceilidh.

I also very much enjoyed working with the dancers, and my interest in dance history was aroused when I saw the way that they danced "The Circassian Circle". Nowadays in Scotland it's usually danced as a big circle (in fact we did that with some of the older schoolchildren, without

calling it The Circassian Circle) but the Islanders have always done it in Sicilian Circle (couple facing couple around the room) formation, which is how it was danced here in the 1800s.

Other Falklands dances also date from the same era, for example La Rinka and Waltz Country Dance. This would suggest that these dances travelled over with some of the early inhabitants and have remained in an almost pure form. I also loved the polka, which was danced to virtually everything that was sung by the great folk group, Jock, Liz and Tim. When we visited Liz at the radio station she gave us each a little teddy bear wearing a FIRS tee-shirt. The bear has now become Glenelvan's mascot, and will be travelling all over with the band - I think Orkney will be his next holiday.

The band was also made very welcome at the hospital day centre, and they said that it was lovely to play for such an appreciative audience.

Our final night was a cracker. The decorations in the Town Hall were still up for our finale and we really felt so much at home. Stuart had written a tune and I had written a dance, copies of which we presented to Derek. The official title is "Volunteer Beach", but the sub-title is "Lament for the Homeless Penguin"! I told you Stuart was concerned about it!

As I said at the time, when I stood on the stage at the Burns Supper I was looking out at a sea of friendly faces, now I really felt that I was looking out at the faces of friends. It was very emotional saying goodbye to everyone that night, however we're hoping to see Derek and Sue, Karen and Jo on this side of the Atlantic in the coming months so that will be something to look forward to.

On behalf of the band, may 1 say how much we truly enjoyed our stay and how much we appreciated the welcome and hospitality that you gave us. We'd love to come back one day and if any of you are planning a trip to Scotland, let Derek, Karen or Jo know and they'll put you in touch with us. 'Til we meet again...

Wool market report for week ending March 2, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

FOR the week ending Friday March 2. wool prices generally slipped by several pence per kilogram clean compared to the previous weeks closing values.

The main exceptions to this were 24 micron and 28 micron fleece wool lots which gained 7 and 2 pence per kilogram respectively.

Closing prices for each micron category are shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table. The AWEX "Eastern Market In-

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down over 2.5 pence per kilogram clean at 365.1 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 367.6 pence per kilogram clean.

Well prepared, stylish, fleece wool lots with good staple strength remain in keen demand compared to inferior types with less than ideal attention to "best practice" clip preparation. This feature represents a key market signal for Falkland Islands farmers along with long term price differentials for lots of differing fibre diameter.

In South Africa 98% of the 6,457 bale offering was cleared. In New Zealand, 78% of the 19,635 bales sold, while in Australia 86% of the 69,214 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the Australian offering were 9,059 bales

of crossbred wool of which 86% were sold.

Old friend Indom sets sail

AFTER almost twenty years in the South Atlantic, the Ministry of Defence tug, *Indomitable* sails home to the UK this week.

The tug sailed from Liverpool on June 6, 1987 and arrived in the Falklands five weeks later. Since then she has assisted Royal Navy ships in Mare Harbour and Stanley and provided assistance to all of the UK resupply ships that visit.

Chief Engineer Brian Quinn was a member of the original crew in 1987 and says that over the past twenty years the crew of the *Indom* have formed strong friendships with Islanders, particularly in Stanley, "...including the late Harry Rowlands who was a very close and dear friend."

The ship is now in Stanley for the final time. She sails for the UK on Monday.

Body found

A BODY, believed to be one of the two missing fisherman who jumped ship in Stanley harbour last month, was found by walkers on Wednesday evening.

It was discovered near the wreck of the *Lady Elizabeth*, at the east end of the harbour.

Police attended and, with assistance from the Fire and Rescue Department, who were training in the area, the body was recovered and a search of the area carried out. This was discontinued as night fell.

While stressing that the body had not yet been officially identified as one of the missing seamen, Inspector Len McGill said he was "encouraged" by the discovery and added, "I sincerely hope our efforts will recover the other one."

The search was continued on Thursday morning and a further sonar search of the scabed will also be made in the area.

Falklands cricketers plan England tour

PLANS are hotting up for the Falkland Islands Cricket Association's first tour to the United Kingdom.

The Association has been inundated with requests from teams in the UK to play against them when they tour in July, with the Falkland Islands much in the news as the 25^{th} anniversary of the conflict approaches.

The Association's application to become a member of the International Cricket Council has also attracted considerable attention, with the vote by the full test-playing nations due to take place at Lord's in June this year.

Richard Marlor of the Cricket Association said the tour will include fixtures against the Foreign and Commonwealth Office XI in London and Norton Rose XI, at Dulwich. The team will then travel to Stowell Park, Gloucestershire, Lord Vesty's private estate and cricket ground, to play the Gloucestershire Gypsies, before heading to Newbury, Berkshire, for the final few days of the tour. There they will play the Falkland Cricket Club in Newbury.

The final game of the tour is

scheduled to take place on July 17, against Ilsley Cricket Club, near Newbury

Richard says the Association has been busy attempting to secure sponsorship for the tour. "A sponsor has already kindly agreed to supply the team's playing whites.

"The Argos group of companies, a long-time supporter of cricket in the Islands, have organised and are sponsoring the game against filley Cricket Club. The Association has also secured sponsorship for new bats and protective equipment for the tour from Boart Longyear."

The final list of players who will be taking part on the tour is rapidly taking shape, he added, "...with both employers and family being cajoled into co-operation!

Governor of the Falkland Islands and Commissioner for South Georgia, Mr Alan Huckle, said the opportunity for change arose with the departure of South Georgia Government's Operations Manager, Gordon Liddle, who left this month to take up a position at Dundee University. "This allowed us to look at a way of getting extra capacity without asking the FCO to do it and pay for it," Mr Huckle said. Mr Liddle's former role will be

Mr Liddle's former role will be amalgamated with the Director of Fisheries position, creating a full time job, Chief Executive Officer.

Mr Huckle said that, as a result, the new First Secretary will be "100% focused on Falklands issues."

A successor to Ms Hall has been appointed and the role of Chief Executive Officer is now being advertised.

Will permit be granted?

NO decision has yet been made on whether or not a work permit will be granted to Terry Gainer, the Canadian appointed as the new General Manager of the Tourist Board.

Cllr Ian Hansen yesterday said he was expecting a decision very soon.

There is speculation about whether or not the permit will be granted as another applicant for the job was Debbie Summers, a local candidate who arguably met the criteria laid out in the advertisement for the position.

AS YOU'LL see when you turn to read the letters page (or, more accurately this week, pages), the debate remains hot over the appointment of the new General Manager of the Tourist Board.

The issue has been addressed in this column in the last two editions and I do not wish to go over old ground. However, I would draw your attention to the letter from Marvin Clarke, which touches on the subject of double standards in the treatment of locally-based people and outside contractors.

I am utterly opposed to contractor-bashing, believing it to be a thinly veiled form of racism, but for years the perception has existed of uneven treatment, and it's something councillors need to bear in mind when waxing lyrical about transparency

We've all heard stories of expatriate civil servants who, having committed some heinous act, were whisked off on the next available flight under a cloak of secrecy, never to be seen again. And yet, Falklands residents committing similar deeds have not had that option of escape and have faced punishment. This isn't as common a scenario as some may make out, but it is something local people understandably feel sensitive about.

Usually the uneven treatment isn't blatant - often it is so subtle you don't even realise it's happening. An example of this was brought to my attention just this week.

On the agenda for yesterday afternoon's meeting of the Police Com-mittee was the recruitment of the new Chief Police Officer. Two separate advertisements were sent out, one for advertising the position locally, the other overseas

While I expected - for obvious reasons - to see differences in the way they would be worded. I was astounded by the disparity in pay offered. The local advert offered a salary ranging from £37,000 to £55,500 while the overseas version offered a rate of £62,000, "...plus benefits." I understand people employed on contract are not entitled to pension

contributions and, therefore, should be compensated for this, but the difference is staggering.

I contacted one of the councillors from the Police Committee and was encouraged to hear he too had concerns about this and was planning to voice these at the meeting. As luck would have it, I was unable to attend as the meeting was scheduled for the time we were in the throes of putting the paper to bed, but I will be very keen to hear the outcome of this discussion.

When recruiting from overseas, we need to offer an enticing package (after all, we are asking people to embark not only on a new job but a new life when they take up contracts here), but I worry that this type of disparity sends the message that locally-employed people are second-class.

Fisheries group challenges port development direction

FALKLANDS based fishing companies are unhappy with the decision to develop port facilities at FIPASS instead of creating a new deep water port at another location and have challenged the terms of reference of the forthcoming visit of port developers Royal Haskoning.

As reported in Penguin News (February 16), two representatives from the London office of Royal Haskoning will be in the Islands from April 17 to May 6, to begin the task of creating a port development plan, focused on FIPASS.

The decision to develop FIPASS in preference to alternative sites was taken by the government (FIG) in 2005 at the end of a process which began in 2001 and has involved a number of separate studies. While it was admitted that FIPASS was a less than ideal site, in the face of projected costs of £40 million for a new port elsewhere, financial constraints were offered by FIG as the reason for choosing FIPASS over alternatives.

A letter recently sent to FIDC General Manager, Mark Brunet, by a group which includes eleven local fishing companies, sets out the industry's case for rejecting FIPASS as too restrictive of future growth and calls for innovative ideas for the funding of a facility at a new site

In the view of Fortuna Ltd Director, Stuart Wallace, one of the signatories of the letter, there is. .. nothing in the Falklands that has such importance for the economy." It was, he said, "a question of the direction of resources," and the ef-fort should be started immediately to find creative ways of financing the project, if necessary over time.

Mr Wallace told Penguin News that while he understood FIG's reluctance to commit the kind of funding that might be involved in creating a new port, all the major players in the two industries which were most important to the Falklands economy - fishing and cruise ship tourism - were united in rejecting FIPASS as a suitable site for development.

Listed in the group's letter to FIDC were a number of practical criteria to be met in order to allow for the required economic expansion of both the fishing and tourism industries. These included adequate water depth, access for larger

vessels and space for the handling and storage of 40-foot containers. The seven metre depth restriction at FIPASS and the approach through the Narrows were cited as already restrictive and a serious obstacle to development.

Mr Wallace told Penguin News that while the authors of the letter had not received a reply from Mr Brunet, they had had a meeting with him during which he thought their views had been "well-received". Mr Wallace felt that in the past the decision making process about the port might have been to an extent hijacked by the non-users of the facility, but now he was confident ...all the drivers of the that. economy are together on the matter.

Councillor Richard Cockwell commented to Penguin News that the recent decision to extend the life of fishing licences from one to twenty-five years was designed to encourage fishing companies to in-vest in onshore added-value activities. This important change in policy had occurred since the decision to further develop FIPASS. If the industry now felt that a re-developed FIPASS would still prove inadequate and a limiting factor on such activities, these concerns de-served to be addressed, he said. **Royal Haskoning visit**

Julian Hodnett and Niek van der Sluijs from Royal Haskoning are to spend three weeks in the Islands.

Before leaving they will present a plan of action for the development of the Falklands' port facilities. They will be supported in their work by a team of six other port development experts based in their UK offices - including a former Falklands fisheries observer, Dr Martin Bailey

The plan will cost £24,000, plus additional expenses estimated at around £10,000.

"Julian and Niek intend to spend as much of their time here as possible working with local port users," a spokesperson for FIDC said.

VETERANS badges are to be awarded to servicemen and women who fought in the Falklands War, the Daily Telegraph reported this week.

The lapel insignia, worn with civilian dress, has only previously been given to those who joined the Armed Forces before December 1969, a period which includes the Second World War, the Korean War

and the Suez conflict.

Chancellor of the Exchequer Gordon Brown was expected to tell MPs this week that the date will be extended to 1982, in part to mark the 25th anniversary Falklands conflict.

Highest price secures government house

THE decision to award a housing tender to a company has been defended by Councillor Mike Summers.

Tenders were invited for the purchase of 1 Davis Street East and the highest bid, from Lewis Clifton of Byron Holdings for £60,000, was eventually accepted.

The tender document contained the following standard provision: "Priority will be given to bids from individuals resident in the Islands who have Falklands status or a PRP. who intend occupying the property as their primary residence, and who do not already own a home in Stanley

It also included the standard provision that the tenderer does not bind itself to accept the highest or any tender

However, Councillor Summers said, Executive Council reviewed the results of the tender exercise and concluded that in this instance it was "in the best interest of the Islands" to accept the highest bid.

When asked what "best interest" meant, Councillor Summers replied. "It was as usual a combination of factors that have to be weighed against each other, but in this instance a judgement was required between net contribution to the housing stock, overall contribution to the housing strategy, and financial issues.

"There was on balance no compelling reason not to accept the highest bid.

The Lands Committee at its meeting last week agreed that it should look more closely at the standard conditions, and decide on a case by case basis which ones should be included.

Fitness professional: guarded approval for post

A PAPER recommending the appointment of an Exercise Referral Practitioner received guarded approval yesterday from the Health Committee, but a final recommendation was deferred until after a planned meeting with a UK trainer, who arrives shortly, and further definition of likely costs

The Committee heard that one of the roles of an Exercise Referral Practitioner would be to act as a point of contact between the Hospital and the Leisure Centre and the development of a range of activitres to aid with patient rehabilitation as well as raising the general level of fitness of the community at large.

FUNDING restrictions at the BBC mean planned live coverage of this year's Liberation Day events will now not be broadcast. However, plans are going ahead

for a live link up with the UK on Sunday, June 17.

Work has been ongoing by various individuals, groups and committees on a programme of events for the 20th Anniversary commemorations in June.

The 2007 Committee, while stressing that details have yet to be finalised, this week announced an outline of the planned activities.

The Falkland Islands Government's (FIG) guests are expected to arrive by airbridge on Tuesday, June 12. A welcome buffet for invited guests will be held at the Town Hall that evening.

On Wednesday morning most visitors will attend briefings on FIG and British Forces activities, followed by a tour of Stanley covering town highlights and history and including a visit to the Museum.

There will be a concert at Christ Church Cathedral performed by the Royal Marine Band in the early evening - details of which will be available in due course. Following the concert, visitors will be invited to dinner at individual homes.

Amongst the guests will be the parents of two men who were lost on HMS Coventry as well as a serving Naval Officer who was on the vessel in 1982. It is hoped to arrange for a small group to visit Pebble Island on June 13 for a brief commemorative service

The programme for Liberation Day will be announced in detail but will be along the usual lines, with the Cathedral Service followed by the parade at the 1982 Memorial and a march through town by Brit-

ish Forces, exercising their Freedom, which was granted in 2002. A public reception will be held

at the Defence Force hall.

Friday, June 15 marks the anni-versary of the liberation of the West and it is planned to hold a reception at Fox Bay for everyone on West Falkland who wishes to attend. Some of the VIP guests and others will be present, and it is hoped to include some individuals now living in Stanley who spent most of the conflict at Fox Bay (subject to transport availability!)

VIPs will attend a Mess Dinner hosted by Commander British Forces South Atlantic Islands that evening.

Q WHAT was the total cost of the investigation and trials of the two Police Officers?

A Principal Crown Counsel Ros Cheek provided this response.

My answer relates only to the costs of investigation and prosecution of the cases against David Morris and Jonathon Butler. The costs incurred by the court (including legal aid) are accounted for under a separate budget.

The figures that I am able to provide are as follows:

1. Cost of investigation: £98,000.00 (ie the figure previously quoted to the *Penguin News* by the former Attorney General)

2. Quantifiable cost of prosecution as invoiced: £108,507.16

In fact the cost of the prosecution is higher than the figure which has been given above. That is because the figure does not include the cost attributable to the time spent by members of the Attorney General's Chambers on the case. No time-recording system is operated at the Attorney General's Chambers, so a cost for staff time cannot be apportioned to any particular matter.

In addition, there will be some other overheads that cannot be apportioned to the case, but these are unlikely to be substantial (eg postage).

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds added, "The costs incurred in respect of the Butler and Morris cases only, that is costs that are outside the ordinary day-to-day running costs of the court, amounted to £17,500.00. "These costs relate to the payments made for travel expenses, accommodation and the time spent on the cases by the two acting Sen-

for Magistrates. "The cost of legal aid assistance given to the two defendants was (rounded to the nearest £1,000) £58,000."

Q AT MEETINGS on the West before the withdrawal of Tamar from most West Ports, an assurance was given that arrangements would be made to deliver fuel by road to farms that had normally had it delivered direct, at a similar cost. It seems a bowser was purchased. Where is it? Why is it not making fuel deliveries? When can we expect it to be in service?

Q Councillor Richard Davies provided the answer to this question. 1 am indebted to FIDC for pro-

viding the background to this reply: A fuel bowser was purchased by

FIDC in order to promote the development of a fuel delivery system on West Falkland for the benefit of all residents.

The bowser is owned by FIDC but will be operated by an individual as a private business. The bowser is currently located in Fox Bay.

The delay in commencing deliveries was due to difficulty in obtaining and fitting essential spare parts. These have been sourced and have now arrived in the Islands.

The Falkland Islands Trust is a UK-based charity which also has management responsibility for the Shackleton Scholarship Fund. UK trustees include several with experience of living and working in the Falklands. The local trustees are Marlene Marsh and Mr Miller.

Agronomist Dr Jim McAdam of Queen's University Belfast, who is a consultant advisor to the UK FI Trust, helped set up a link with the University of Magallanes and the Patagonian Institute of Horticulture several years ago.

Jim, who once worked for the Falkland Islands Grasslands Trial Unit, a forerunner of the Agricul-

The couple described their trip to the Falklands as "perfect", adding, "thank you to everyone who helped make our trip so enjoyable.



Get decision makers behind the wheel

A COUPLE of interesting items in last week's Penguin News compelled us to comment.

Firstly your editorial about West ads. When we discovered prior Roads. to last years 'Farmers Week', that a Meeting had been arranged with Councillors to discuss road designation we tried, without success, to interest Camp councillors in driving down the road from Fox Bay to Port Stephens. This was because the road was in a particularly poor state and we could not see the logic in imposing restrictions on drivers and vehicles when the biggest obstacle to road safety was the road itself.

As a consolation we took a few pictures of some parts of this road. Unfortunately pictures do not con-vey the same loosening effect on the bowels as fear instilled by being behind the driving wheel of an eight tonne tractor unit when the twelve tonne trailer is full of either wool, sheep or machinery more intent on obeying the laws of gravity or inertia than the driver's controls.

I agree with you that it would be a good experience for our decision makers to sit behind the driving wheel on this type of vehicle once

in a while. With the new ferry soon to be in service and the even-tual closing of all 'non essential ports' then this type of multi-purpose vehicle should be used more frequently, not just between Sep-tember and April. Even then this is reliant on road conditions and the drivers' intestinal fortitude.

The second item was the one about the Fair Trade event at the 'Boathouse' which highlighted the comparison between the price the tea producer received compared to the price paid by the end user. We recently received payment

for a consignment of wethers sent to FIMCO, this worked out at an average price of £0.34 per kilo. With the average price of similar meat sold locally at around £2.50 per kilo we wouldn't mind specu-lating that the price paid for this meat in Europe by the end user has a similar variation in price as the Third World tea producer.

Unknown British Marine buried

By Peter Pepper AN UNKNOWN British sailor has been buried with an Argentine Honour Guard, breaking the gloom of British-Argentine relations for just a moment. The funeral took place on Friday, March 2. in the British Cemetery, Buenos Aires.

The sailor came from the 14gun corvette. *HMS Swift*. which sank in what is now Puerto Deseado in 1770. The *Swift* was on a patrol from Port Egmont in the Falkland Islands, and entered Puerto Deseado in a storm. It struck a rock and then beached itself. But as the tide went out the ship suddenly slipped back into the water drowning three members of the crew. One of the dead was found soon afterwards, but not the other two - both of whom were marines.

The remains of one of these was found in the wreck after salvage work began in the 1980s. The two missing men were John Ballard and Robert Rusker but it has not been possible to find out from the bones which of these two it was. Argentine and British Marine archaeologists began to salvage the wreck in 1983, and there is now a museum in Puerto Deseado of artefacts brought up from it.

The unknown marine's coffin was covered by the White Ensign, and his remains were buried by the side of the British Legion Monument at the cemetery, alongside the graves of several other British servicemen, who had died in Argentina.

The funeral was attended by

British Ambassador, John Hughes, Defence Attaché, Captain Chris Hyldon, and Defence Coordinator. Sergeant Paul Treslove. The service was conducted in English, but with several Spanish prayers, at the cemetery chapel, by Presbyterian Minister the Rev. Kenneth Murray, who is Argentine of Scottish descent.

The burial was followed by a reception at the Residence of the British Ambassador. Photographs of items recovered from the wreck were on display, and there was a projected presentation of the work of the nautical archaeologists in Puerto Deseado. Ambassador Hughes was presented with a book outlining the work, and made a short address.

The funeral recalls the early

days of British exploration in the area. Puerto Deseado derives its name from Port Desire, named by the British navigator Cavendish after his ship the *Desire* in 1586, during his first expedition. This took him around the world, making him the third man to do this after Magellan and Sir Francis Drake.

During Cavendish's second expedition, the *Desire* was under the command of John Davis. Blown off course by a storm in 1592. Davis made the first recorded sighting of the Falklands - which is one of the reasons for the Falklands' motto "Desire the Right".

Port Egmont, where the *Swift* was based when it was lost, is of course the basis for the British claim to the Falklands.

Author hunts for aviation 'Holy Grail'

NO. it's not a follow-on to the *Da Vinci Code* but a final attempt by a weary author to obtain a photo any photo - of an elusive Falkland Islands aeroplane.

Over the last 18 months, on a purely voluntary basis. Douglas Rough has completed the *Illustrated History of Falkland Islands Civilian-Registered aircraft from 1948 to 2007* and only one photo has eluded him. It depicts the second FIGAS De Havilland DHC-2 Beaver which was delivered in August 1955 and, before entering service, was test-flown by Jim Kerr from Stanley Harbour on September 29 that year.

It came to an untimely end at the Moro on February 19, 1958 when it capsized and sank on takeoff whilst being flown by George Toye. The aircraft was brought back as deck cargo to Stanley Harbour on board either the Shackleton or John Biscoe.

Douglas has traced, and talked to, survivors as lar away as New Zealand. They say many people took photographs both at the Moro and Stanley but to date not one of them has surfaced. Douglas is doing an 'Additions and Amendments' addendum to his recent aircraft histories and would like to include a photo of this Beaver if one can be located.

He thought he had a breakthrough last year when he was sent a digital photo of the rear fuselage still present in a Stanley back garden. "Apparently, the whole fuselage had existed up until about 12 years ago. What the discovery proved was, what had been surmised until then, that the Beaver was silver overall with a distinctive blue cheat line on the fuselage and fin rather like the Beaver that replaced it in July 1958, VP-FAH of which colour and black and white photos abound."


What makes it difficult to identify. Douglas says, is that it reportedly never wore its Fatklands registration letters VP-FAF (but actually VP-FAG due to clerical error). "Its sister aircraft at the time of its capsizing was FIGAS' first Beaver VP-FAE which at the time, to complicate matters, was also silver/blue and also didn't wear its registration letters.

"FAE was later repainted red overall but in its early days was indistinguishable from FAE."

Douglas is offering a bottle of champagne to anybody in Stanley or Camp who can come up with a photo of this 'Holy Grail'.

"The crucial years are 1955 – 1958. Did you photograph it on its September 1955 test flight from Stanley Harbour or at the Moro in February 1958 or on the ship at Stanley shortly after or dumped at the Racecourse/Landplane hangar when used as a spares source? Or even complete in a Stanley back garden many moons ago?"

Anybody interested in the histories of all the Falklands' registered aircraft can view them on CDs located at the Archives office.

LOCATION OF POPULATION - 2006



A CENSUS of the population of the Falkland Islands was undertaken on 8 October 2006, in accordance with the Census Order 2006. Copies of the full report are available in electronic format from the Registrar General and the Attorney General's Offices.

A summary of the population trends is presented here, with details taken from Rosalind Cheek's Report By The Acting Attorney General On Census Patterns Shown By The 2006 Census. Annexed to this report are the Census Statistics 2006, and The Comparative Census Statistics, 1986 to 2006.

The location of the population shows a continued decline of the population in Camp, reducing from 390 to 361, a decline of 7.43% since 2001. Only the outer-lying Islands do not conform to this trend, increasing their population from 38 to 42 between 2001 and 2006. The population of Stanley has increased in that period from 1989 to 2115, and now makes up 85.35% of the population.

The rate of immigration appears to be slowing, with the numbers of persons resident for less than five years falling since 2001, but the number of persons resident more than ten years continuing to increase (to 1557 in 2006 from 1507 in 2001), as it has done since 1991.

The population born in the Falkland Islands continues to rise, from 1325 in 2001, to 1339 in 2006. As a proportion of the total population, the number born in the Falkland Islands has actually fallen slightly between 2001 and 2006. 54.2% of the population were born in the Falkland Islands in 2001 as opposed to 53.2% in 2006. The proportion of the population born in the United Kingdom and St Helena continues to

population. The next most signifipopulation by place of birth is of persons born in Chile, the num-bers of which doubled between 2001 and 2005 from 65 to 131.


The number of persons employed has decreased slightly between 2001 and 2006, from 1547 to 1516. As a percentage of the population, beween 2001 and 2006, the number of persons employed has fallen by employed" has increased by only two. from 458 in 2001 to 460 in 2006. As a proportion of the total population, the number of persons "not employed" has decreased slightly. from 19.25% in 2001 to 18.56% in 2006. For the first time, female num-

bers in professional, technical and related categories exceed male, at 150 compared to 123. The decline in employment in agriculture and related areas continues. from 221 workers in 2001 to 205 in 2006.

The trend towards a more educated population continues, with persons with recognised external examinations at secondary level increasing from 955 (40.14% of the population) in 2001 to 1033 (41.69% of the population) in 2006. Persons with tertiary qualifications increased from 573 (24.08% of the population) in 2001 to 619 (24.98% of the population) in 2006. Only a slight decrease in male tertiary qualification goes against the continuing trend of a generally more educated population (down to 318, or 25.24% of the total number of males, in 2006 from 331. or 27.27% of the total population of males, in 2001.)

The number of houses in Stanley has increased from 690 in 2001 to 783 in 2006. Curiously the number of flats has decreased in that period






from 104 to 86. The number of dwellings recorded in Camp under the census continues to decline in conjunction with the population.

House ownership in Stanley continues to increase, from 528 in 2001 to 585 in 2006 (10.79%), but that rate of increase has slowed from the previous trend (23.94% 1996 to 2001 and 30.27% 1991 to 1996), likely reflecting the nearing of completion Stanley of the East Stanley development.


EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENTS BY SEX AND LOCATION, 1991-2006



CBF's XI claim consolation victory in South Atlantic Ashes

IN THE final match of the South Atlantic Ashes series, the military side recovered from a dreadful start to their innings to secure an unlikely victory against the Governor's XI.

The series ended 2-1 in favour of the Governor's XI, who were presented with the Ashes after the match by the Commander British Forces, Brigadier Nick Davies.

Having won the toss for the first time in the series, the CBF's captain. Pierce, elected to bat first. Not for the first time in the series, the CBF's side made a mess of their start, with Zanelli bowled in the fourth over by the Governor's captain, Marlor, for 6.

The CBF's top-order then collapsed over the next 10 overs, with McCulloch (3 wickets), Reeves (3) and Forster (2) doing the damage for the local side, and only Pierce, the CBF's best player over the series, making an impression on the scoreboard. Pierce eventually fell to a beautiful delivery from McCulloch whilst on 19.

With Pierce gone relatively cheaply, the CBF's side were left staring down the barrel of another heavy defeat, on just 45 for the loss of 6 wickets after 15 overs.

However, the dismissal of Pierce brought Van Zyl, who had threatened to cut loose in the previous two matches, to the crease. On this occasion he lived up to those threats and he carted the Governor's bowlers all over the field, hitting 8 fours and 2 sixes in a knock of 71.

It wasn't until the 30th over

that the Governor's XI took the CBF's seventh wicket and by that time the military team had raced on to 125. Receves eventually claimed Van Zyt's wicket. The CBF's remaining 3 wickets fell for 20 runs, leaving the CBF's side on a modest total of 144 all out, off 37.2 overs.

Pick of the bowlers for the Governor's side were Reeves, who bowled 5 overs and took 3 wickets for 17 runs, McCulloch, 8 overs, 3 for 31, Marlor, 5.2 overs, 2 for 10, and Forster, 8 overs, 2 for 19.

The Governor's XI went into bat with what seemed on paper to be an extremely strong batting lineup and looking at a run-rate of less than 4 runs per over to secure a series whitewash. However, the Governor's batsmen looked determined to throw away their wickets from the very first over, with McCulloch bowled facing his first ball from Pierce for 0. Reeves (bowled for 7), Graham (run out for 5). Clapp (run out for 5), Anderson (bowled for 2) and Cofre (bowled for 0) never looked liked hanging around and wickets fell regularly.

Only Forster of the Governor's top-order looked capable of scoring, but he was dismissed, caught from the bowling of Price, on 29. With the score on 59 for 7 after 19 overs, the Governor's side had turned what looked like certain victory into certain defeat.

Dawson was doing his best to keep the scoreboard ticking over for the Governor's XI and he showed the upper-order how to preserve a wicket, batting well to finish on 26 not out.

Titterington (bowled for 5). Marlor (bowled for 9) and Diggle (bowled for 1) frustrated the CBF's bowlers for another 13 overs, attempting to provide Dawson with support at the other end, but they managed only to postpone what had become the inevitable and the Governor's XI slumped to 102 all out, off 34.5 overs, and a 42-run defeat.

Pick of the bowlers for the CBF's XI were Price, 8 overs, 4 wickets for 22 runs, and Pierce, 8 overs, 2 for 21. The CBF's Van Zyl was named Man of the Match.

After the match, the presentation of this season's trophies and awards was made, attended by the Governor and the Commander British Forces. Firstly, the captain of the Mount Pleasant Cricket Club, Kieran Pierce, was presented with the inaugural Falklands Twenty 20 Cup by the Governor. Then the Man of the Match and Series awards for the South Atlantic Ashes were presented by the Governor to Isaac Forster, Derek Reeves and Johan Van Zyl.

Derek Reeves was named as the Man of the Series, although special mention was also made of Kieran Pierce for his outstanding performances throughout the series for the CBF's XI.

Finally, the Commander of British Forces returned the South Atlantic Ashes to the captain of the Governor's XI, Richard Marlor. Penguin News, March 16, 2007 Letter reunites old '82 friends

A FALKLANDS veteran and an Islander have been back in touch almost twenty-five years after they first met.

Islander John Thain contacted Eddy Candlish after the former Royal Marine wrote to *Penguin News* about his experiences in 1982.

He was the only survivor when two Gazelle helicopters were shot down at San Carlos.

John was one of the people Eddy referred to in assisting with the recovery of his pilot. Sgt Andy Evans, from the sea and taking him to what used to be the cook house at Port San Carlos.

John also assisted with the return of Andy's body to the landing beach used by the British Forces whilst the landings were still going on, along with the late Fred Ford and Eddy himself.

John told *Penguin News*. "I have often wondered who it was that threw me to the ground and covered me with his body for protection whilst the first air raids came in. As you can imagine there were hundreds of people running all over the place.

"After contacting Eddy it transpires that it was Eddy himself."

Eddy, who now lives in Australia, was delighted to hear from John. He wrote to him, "I distinctly remember having to take cover, in some of the Paras shellscrapes, and at the same time dragging a young lad with me and throwing him in the trench before covering him with my body for protection."

Andy and Eddy's helicopter (CX) was recovered in the October of 1982 and shipped back to UK. Eddy saw her again a couple of years later whilst she was at the Army Air Corps Centre in Middle Wallop, "...in quite a sorry state but being used by the REME technicians to practice battle damage repair on. In a sense this was good as at least she was still being useful.

"Some time, much more recently, it appears she was to be sold for scrap and this is where Aeroventure (an aviation museum in Yorkshire) stepped in and rescued her for their display."

Eddy reported that the Gazelles are now being retired from British military service. "Staff Sgt Bertie Birtles is a REME technician and was keen to restore a Gazelle for posterity; he came across CX in the museum and was able to get all the relevant permission and backing to carry out the work on her. This is currently in progress.

"The intention is to have her ready for June 28 when a 25th commemorative event will take place at RAF Waddington, and she will be one of the central items on display. After that she will go back to Aeroventure as an ongoing exhibit.

"Our final intent is to be able to have the aircraft at the museum as a lasting tribute to all the guys in the Squadron who were in the Falklands and especially to those that didn't come home, the resting place of three of whom is at the bottom of the South Atlantic."

It is hoped the project will be completed by June and, apart from the footage being used at shows, there will be a DVD version which will be sold in the shops.

(Graham can sleep easily though as sources have revealed the Aussie duo were not feeling particularly well by the time they reached the yacht.)

"I conducted my first big British interview on Arlette Betts' lawn with Graham holding a glass of wine and a cigarette just out of shot," said lan.

Away from the sea, drummer with a band called the Bank Holidays, Ian was very happy to stumble across local band SWN in the Victory Bar.

"I ended up doing a couple of Johnny Cash and Bob Dylan numbers with them and it seemed to be well received," he said, adding, "...I think I left the stage at just the right time, though."

Business, under the chair of Cllr Mike Rendell in the absence of Cllr Richard Davies who gave his apologies, then moved on to applications received for planning permission.

Dealing first with those deferred at previous meetings, members were informed Joan Bound's proposal in principle for the erection of a house to the rear of 10 Barrack Street might now be withdrawn as the Lands Committee had turned down the proposed access from the Fire Station land.

Also deferred again was Cable and Wireless's proposal to erect a tall mast and equipment hut south of the FIDF's HQ on Kiel Canal Road – a meeting with the Director of Civil Aviation is to be held shortly, it was understood.

Alan Dawson, the Building Adviser, reported he had had discussions with Peter McKay on the disused Portakabin sited at 3 Brandon Road West, and was advised it was his intention to move it to a container park within the next two months. Members decided to grant temporary planning permission for the Portakabin to remain for that period of time. New applications

The following four applications for detailed planning permission were granted with all but one subject to conditions: a dwelling on land at the rear of 7 McKay Close for Hector Villalon; erection of a closeboarded L6 metre-high fence on the north, south and east boundaries of their dwelling at 15 Biggs Road for Geoff and Sara Loftus; an extension to their shop (known as Southern Imports) at 1 Lookout Industrial Estate for Ali and Marlane Marsh; and the extension to his bakery at The Bread Shop on Dean Street for Malcolm Jackson.

Keith Bonner also submitted an application in respect of his taxi business he is operating from his dwelling at 4 Felton Court. This sought retrospective planning permission and included a new application for off-street parking off Lellman Way.

It was reported that an objection had been received from a resident in Felton Court arising from parking on the footpath, and it had been felt that the proposal to provide the off-street parking overcame this. Members therefore resolved to grant conditional planning permission, one of the conditions requiring that no more than three taxis shall be operated from the premises. it being understood that other arrangements existed for the operation of the remainder of the applicant's fleet of taxis.

Alan Dawson then reported upon applications received for building permits, pointing out where he needed further details and those he had been able to grant.

A positive recommendation to ExCo was then agreed by members as to the variation on the north side of the Canache of the Stanley Common Boundary. Alison Inglis's report recommended the removal of an area of land from Stanley Common (and in consequence from the Stanley Common National Nature Reserve), also that the Canache (Mooring of Watercraft) Development Regulations be revoked. It further recommended that concrete marker posts be erected to demarcate the new boundaries of the common.

Next, a letter from Bruce May was considered: this asked for more time to complete the work for his off-street parking grant at 9 Kent Road and members agreed to grant a further six months to enable him to have the "black top" work carried out.

The next meeting will be held on Thursday, April 12.

Wool market report for week ending March 9, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

Greasy wool prices surged in value in South Africa and Australia during the week ending March 9, 2007.

As shown in the Micron Price Guide below, fleece wool lots finer than 24 micron increased in value by between 13 and 26 pence per kilogram clean while lots between 25 and 32 micron increased in value by between five and nine pence per kilogram clean. Very broad fleece wool lots struggled to hold value in New Zealand.

Closing prices for each micron category are shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table. The AWEX "Eastern Market In-

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up 15 pence per kilogram clean at 380.2 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 365.1 pence per kilogram clean

Indusiry analysts attributed the large price increases to continued strong demand for wool from fashion houses and strong demand for wool from processors on top of markedly reduced greasy wool offerings. It is likely that the quantity of wool on sale over the next month or two will continue to be well below "normal" due mainly to the severity of drought in Australia.

According to Mr. Chris Wilcox, chief economist of Woolmark Market Intelligence, "the increasingly upbeat fashion outlook for fine merino wool, the best pipeline activity seen in many years and tighter Australian raw-wool supplies will sustain the present level of auction prices for the rest of the season." As noted in market reports over the last few months, well prepared, stylish, fleece wool lots with good staple strength remained in keenest demand during the week.

In South Africa 99% of the 9,342 bale offering was cleared. In New Zealand, 81% of the 10,495 bales sold, while in Australia 93% of the 44,715 bales presented to the trade changed hands.

Next week approximately 90,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia.



Lives lost through fishing activity

IN CELEBRATING the 20 years of Fisheries, let's not forget the cost paid in lost lives.

I was a member of the government that set up the boundaries of the Falkland Inner Conservation Zone, the (FICZ) and later the Outer Economic Territorial Waters to further protect the fish stocks in the South West Atlantic, with offshore oil also in mind.

I was also a strong voice in establishing these boundaries both for better control of fish stocks and off shore oil exploration. The Gover-nor then. David Tatham, and the legal advisor from FCO, David Anderson, will remember my persuasion on this topic.

I have always had reservation about issuing licences with no limit on catch. I am pleased that limits on toothfish were set at 300 tonnes and vessels have to call in to Stanley to have the catch weighed. Some have been caught with over catch. much to the embarrassment of locals involved with the pirate Captains.

In your column Your Questions Answered there is no room for preamble, so I ask, apart from the two local firemen who lost their lives fighting a fire on a fishing vessel, how many fisherman have perished in our waters to date?

The figure will be embarrassingly high. To ease our conscience we must have tighter control through the licence to fish in our waters.

Stringent health and safety measures that should embrace checks on condition of gear and tackle, curtail fishing activity in extreme weather conditions. Look at welfare of crew and their comfort. I know the cry will be "we can't impose our desired standards on foreign registered ships" but we can set basic requirements. And we don't have to sell licences to rogues or pirates.


Health and Safety Legislation modelled on that for the UK North Sea, was set up in 1997/98 to cover drilling operations, I assume this legislation covers our economic zone - be it oil exploration or fishery activity.

Marine Officer Jon Clark enlisted the help of Sgt David Roberts to find an answer to Mr Goss's query.

After examining the records, Sgt Roberts found that, between the years 1987 and 2006, 42 deaths occurred due to injuries attributable to fishing vessel accidents. This figure, however, does not include those lost overboard and bodies not recovered.

Mr Clark said that in a report produced by the UK Marine Investigation Branch in 2002, fishing was described as the most dangerous occupation, with the risk of death being around thirteen times higher than the next most dangerous category, the construction industry.

Fishing news

Licence revoked

THE fishing licence issued to the ship Jih Da Gan, the jigger from which twelve men jumped last month, has been revoked

According to a government statement, following consideration of the available evidence the Director of Fisheries concluded that the conditions prevailing aboard the Jih Da Gan were "unacceptable" and he moved to revoke the licence.

In its statement, the government said it views any abuse or maltreatment of fishing vessel crews 'very seriously" and, in addition to considering issues of criminal liability where appropriate, "will take any action available to it as necessary to ensure that the responsibilities for the efficient management of the fishery on behalf of the Falkland Islands are properly discharged

Squid return to zones

AFTER a slow start, squid catches are improving in our waters.

Cold water anomalies prevented an early immigration of illex to the Falkland zones, and at the begin-ning of March all Falklands-licensed jiggers were on the high seas where catches reached up to 70 metric tonnes (mt) per night

However Senior Fisheries Scientist, Sasha Arkhipkin, said several days of strong north-westerly winds finally brought warm water into the zone, "...and together with them came squid."

Average catches of illex have increased from 15-18 to 30-38 mt/ night, and the number of jiggers from just two on March 13 to 26 March 19.

Catches of loligo squid have improved too, increasing from around 15 mt/day at the start of the season to 50 - 64 mt/day.

SAFC: another non-starter

THE latest meeting of the South Atlantic Fisheries Council (SAFC), held in Buenos Aires last week, has once again proven an unproductive affair

Councillor Andrea Clausen reported that "no progress" was made on re-starting the main discussions on areas of mutual interest (such as data exchange and straddling stock management), "...as Argentina still wishes to amend the mandate of the SAFC

The Falklands Director of Fisheries, John Barton, attended the meeting.

Tourism work permit denied | FIDF remember

THE application for a work permit for the General Manager designate of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board (FITB) has been rejected by the Principal Immigration Officer.

Peter King turned down the application for a permit for Canadian Terry Gainer, as he deemed there was a qualified local candidate who met the requirements of the post.

Chairman of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board, Councillor lan Hansen, was informed of the final decision yesterday. He said there were many reasons given by Mr King for the decision, "...but the bottom line is that Immigration believes there is a Falkland Islands applicant who can fill the post. He had looked into it very carefully."

Mr Gainer now has the right to appeal to the Governor in Executive Council, something he can do himself or ask FITB to do on his behalf.

Whether or not an appeal will be lodged. Cllr Hansen did not know. He commented, "I'm in the process of contacting the other directors and we are planning to meet next week.

EGM stalled?

The rumoured intention of the members of FITB to call for the resignation of their directors appears to be meeting procedural difficulties.

Immediately after the controversy caused by the board's decision to appoint Mr Gainer, there were calls by members for an Extraordinary General Meeting. First among a list of proposed resolutions to be put to such a meeting was that the members no longer had any confidence in the board's directors.

According to the Articles of the Tourist Board, which is a Company Limited by Guarantee. an Extraordinary General Meeting can be called by the Company Secretary on receipt of signed requisitions from at least ten per cent of the members.

Asked to comment if and when such a meeting would take place, a spokesman for the legal firm, McGrigors, who act as Company Secretary to the Board, said on Wednesday that if an Extraordinary General Meeting had not already been called, it could be assumed that the required number of signed requisitions had not been received.

Second resignation

The resignation of John Fowler as an FITB director, which was reported last week, has been followed by that of Debbie Summers, whose unsuccessful candidacy for the position of General Manager sparked off the current controversy.

Ms Summers tendered her resignation while in the Islands for three days, after arriving from the annual Miami Sea Trade conference and before leaving to conduct a port infrastructure and shore excursion study of nine ports in South America.

She declined to comment on the reason for her resignation.

MEMBERS of the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) who were called out to repel the invading Argentine force on the night of April 1, 1982 are to hold their own commemorations next weekend.

The strength of the Defence Force that night numbered thirtytwo men. To commemorate the event, a service of remembrance will be held on Sunday April, 1. At 2.20pm, the FIDF 1982

will arrive veterans at the Liberation Monument, accompanied by an FIDF Quarter Guard and a service of commemoration will begin ten minutes later.

A private reception at Govern-ment House will follow, during which His Excellency the Governor will present commemorative badges to the FIDF veterans.

At 4.30pm, a private buffet reception will be held at the FIDF Club, which will be open to all holders of the 1982 South Atlantic medal and their spouses and other invited guests.

It is appropriate for medals and decorations to be worn for this occasion.

Rotterdam's on her own

JUST one ship will visit the Falklands this week, the penultimate vessel of the season.

Rotterdam will bring approximately 1,300 visitors to Stanley on Wednesday.

THE level of fundraising that goes on here has become quite legendary. I

would be curious to know just how much is raised in a given year; in this edition of *Penguin News* alone, you'll find Andy Brownlee, who raised more than £3,000 for Cancer Support, and Ali Liddle who, to date, has gathered around £1,500 for SAMA82. Given the size of our population, these sums alone are staggering.

During his visit earlier this year, John Phillips of the SAMA Pilgrimage Committee said they aim to raise around £350,000 to pay for the visit of more than two hundred veterans in November.

I've heard a couple of people question why the pilgrims have to char-ter a flight when the MoD should really step in and offer an aircraft -particularly in this 25th year, an anniversary that the military fully rec-ognises (unlike the 20th). The official line is normally along the lines of "if we do it for Falklands veterans, we'll have to do it for veterans of all the other wars and campaigns, too." the other wars and campaigns, too.

OK, so if supporting the pilgrimage as a whole is too ambitious, surely help with flights could be offered in another way?

Most years, a small group of veterans (usually no more than ten) return to the Islands to participate in Remembrance Sunday. The offer by the MoD of spare seats on the aircraft to these men - either free of charge or at indulgence rates - would be a welcome move, and would win the military a lot of Brownie points.

1 WAS dismayed to discover that the breast screening programme for which Andy Brownlee has been fundraising could in fact have been well underway in the Falklands by now, had a former council not taken the decision to do without it.

I am told that when the time approached for the renewal of the hospital x-ray equipment a few years ago councillors were given the option of incorporating the ability to conduct breast screening but, due to cost, they opted out.

Given what seems the extraordinarily high number of people who contract cancer in the Falklands, I am astounded this decision was made. It's now far too late to revoke the decision - the new x-ray equipment has been in place for years - but I hope the lesson is learned.

Our community doesn't agree on too many things but I believe we are unanimous in the view that health should have top priority in all things budgetary - admittedly, closely followed by education - and should an opportunity like this present itself again. I hope we don't miss it.

Companies pledge support for Commonwealth Games team

FALKLAND Island Holdings (FIH) and the Caribbean Alliance Insurance Company (CAIC) have announced a joint financial package, aimed at assisting Falklands competitors in their quest to compete in the 20th Commonwealth Games in New Delhi in 2010.

The two companies will contribute £40,000 over the next four years, which will be divided into annual payments of £10,000, leading up to the start of the Games in October 2010.

The financial assistance is primarily targeted to assist young competitors qualify in their respective sports, and the cash includes a considerable sum which will finance a series of sporting scholarships for Falklands youngsters.

Additionally, young athletes will have the opportunity to receive top-class coaching in clay target and pistol shooting disciplines. while badminton players will also benefit through qualified coaches being brought to the Islands to assist their preparations.

Through the innovative FIH/ CAIC 'Developing for the Future' programme, the shot gun and pistol ranges in Stanley will be modernised and should reach international standard by the time the next Commonwealth Games are staged. The present open air firing point will be covered to give protection to the shooters, and a modern 'turning target' system for pistol shooters will be installed.

The Badminton Club, which has an exciting group of youngsters training regularly, will, through the financial package, receive new equipment in the form of rackets and shuttlecocks.

The club will also set up a series of competitive tournaments in Chile aimed at providing wider international competition for the players. A qualified coach will be recruited and brought to the Islands to supervise several weeks of training. The Swimming Club intend to purchase much needed turning blocks for the pool, while also heading for Chile in the search of advanced training and competitive requirements.

David Hudd, Chairman of Falkland Islands Holdings plc said, "I am delighted that, together with Caribbean Alliance, we have been able to make this long term commitment to sport in the Falklands.

"The presence of a strong team from the Falklands can only en-

Patrick Watts, Chairman of the Falklands Commonwealth Games Association, thanked FIH and CAIC for their "magnificent" financial which will not only assistance, " upgrade our facilities locally, but will also enable our competitors to recerve valuable competitive international experience prior to the

next Commonwealth Games." He added, "We are particularly grateful to Mr Hudd for his most enthusiastic and energetic support to our prospective Commonwealth Games competitors. This four year package will encourage many youngsters in the Falklands to set their sights on qualifying for the 2010 Games

The FIH/CAIC financial package follows extensive assistance provided to the Falklands prior to the Commonwealth Games in Melbourne in 2006. The companies financed the air fares for a team of full-bore rifle shooters to attend the annual National Rifle Association Championships at Bisley, Surrey and the Gun Club benefited through the purchase of a shot gun practice laser system and a new clay pigeon trap, while two qualified coaches were brought in from Australia to assist with the Commonwealth Games preparations

In 1993 the Falklands took part, for the first time, in the Island Games, a bionnial event. The Falkland Islands Company, a subsidiary of FIH, kindly offered to sponsor the official team tracksuits on that occasion They have also incorporated the Commonwealth Games uniforms and tracksuits into their long standing and much appreciated gesture.

JPs concerned about months without Senior Magistrate

A GROUP of Justices of the Peace (JPs) are concerned that no replacement has yet been appointed for the Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds, who vacates her post this month

In a letter to the Governor sent early this month, Judy Summers JP and Tim Blake JP asked for assurance that a new Senior Magistrate will soon be appointed. In the ab-sence of a Senior Magistrate, a panel of JPs preside over cases in court

Mrs Summers and Mr Blake wrote, "There are some issues, particularly in the Civil Court, that Justices are not qualified to deal with, which could create more problems and possible delays.

Penguin News contacted Acting Governor Harriet Hall to ask if the supply of a locum Magistrate to cover the gap was being investigated. She would not speculate on the possibility of locum cover but said interviews for the Senior Magistrate's position will take place in first week of April.

The interview panel is aware of the timings of the vacancy. Ms Hall said, and she would not comment

on "hypothetical gaps". "If necessary the Governor will take steps to find an appropriate way forward," she added.

No-smoking tax incentives unpopular

THE meeting on Wednesday of the impressively titled Working Group on Possible Legal Prohibition on smoking in public places began with a correction to the minutes by Senior Medical Officer, Dr Roger Diggle.

He wished to make it clear that he had not, as the minutes suggested, made the claim that exposure to smoking did no harm to workers, but that there were much greater risks to health and safety in the work place. A recent study in Great Britain had indicated only twentytwo deaths in a year that could be definitively attributed to workers' exposure to tobacco smoke.

According to fellow group member, Chamber of Commerce Representative, Mike Forrest, translated to Falkland Islands terms, such an incidence of mortality related to passive smoking in the work place would work out at around one death every hundred years.

The Working Group discussed feedback from the Chamber of Commerce and Stanley's licensed victuallers, which had been collected by Mr Forrest and Ms Mhari Ashworth. The former group had been asked whether employers in general would implement a ban on smoking in the workplace and to give their views on possible tax incentives for publicans to impose voluntary bans on smoking by both employees and customers.

It was noted with some satisfaction by the Chair, Councillor Dr Andrea Clausen, that of nineteen businesses which had responded to the Chamber of Commerce questions, a significant majority had already imposed work place smoking bans, some as long ago as 1997. Very few business people were against such a step being taken though at least one contributor stressed that such a decision was for individual businesses to make and not for "part time politicians".

Only two of the businesses balloted were in favour of tax incentives being offered to publicans and the group also heard that Financial Secretary Derek Howatt was of the opinion that the tax system would be an inappropriate vehicle to use as an incentive to employers to ban smoking in their work places.

Councillor Clausen reminded the meeting that at a previous session it had been decided that the group should address more than the health and safety issues surrounding smoking in the workplace and that their objective should be the reduction of smoking generally in the Falkland Islands. If this goal was to be achieved, she said, it was unlikely that there was one single specific tool which would be effective and recommended that a group of possible routes be considered.

Possible methods proposed by Councillor Clausen for reducing the incidence of tobacco smoking in the Islands included a ban on smoking in all FIG owned premises, further increases in the amount of duty imposed on tobacco products, raising the legal age limit for smoking, increasing the powers of teachers and the police to confiscate cigarettes from under-age smokers, the introduction into the Community School of the DARE programme, tax relief, and a total ban on smoking in all enclosed public places.

Of these suggestions, the majority of which met with some degree of approval, the possibility that government might increase the duty on tobacco products to prohibitive heights provoked a lively debate, with some members feeling that this would unfairly penalise people who were, in effect, addicted. Councillor Mike Summers said that FIG's policy for some years had been to make continual increases of duty in excess of the prevailing rate of inflation, but he believed there was no evidence that this had served as a deterrent.

While Working Group members Mike Forrest and Mhari Ashworth agreed that they were against such radically increased rates of duty on tobacco products, local publican, Ali Jacobsen, said that he would be in favour, but only if the extra revenue earned by government could be dedicated to helping smokers who wanted to give up the habit. Councillors Summers and Clausen agreed that such an idea could be discussed by the Select Committee on the Budget and that such an approach "bore examination."

Ascension Islanders 'betrayed'

FIVE members of the seven-man Island Council on Ascension Island, established in 2002 on the promise of permanent rights of abode and property ownership for the Island's one thousand inhabitants, are reported to have resigned in protest over Britain's decision to back down on those promises.

The idea of the proposed reforms, which have now apparently been abandoned by the British Government, was to create a "settled society" with taxation and representation for islanders.

Previously the island's one thousand or so inhabitants, mainly from Saint Helena, were expected to leave the island once their work contracts were completed.

A draft land register was prepared to allow property ownership and islanders invested in the hotel, petrol station and shop, previously Crown property or owned by the commercial "users"

According to a report published in the Daily Telegraph by Philip Johnston, islanders have accused ministers of betrayal and of deception - and a visit by a Foreign Office delegation designed to smooth ruffled feathers has merely made matters worse.

According to the *Telegraph* report, the islanders believe the American military objected to the idea of a settled community on Ascension. The controversy has been likened to the treatment of the Chagossian islanders, forcibly removed from Diego Garcia in the Indian Ocean to make way for the American air force.

Foreign Office Minister Lord Triesman, is reported as having told parliament last year that the reforms were dropped because of the contingent financial liabilities that British taxpayers would face if they had to bail out the islanders.

Johnston quotes councillors as saying, "During the FCO visit we were left in no doubt that not only were our hopes misplaced but that we had all been misled and misinformed at every step of the way."

Court news - Magistrate hears final three cases

THERE were three cases heard before Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds on Wednesday, in what she later told the court would be her last appearance before the end of her contract.

The Senior Magistrate told the court that despite the fact Mr Hawksworth had served a custodial sentence for another assault since the date of his first conviction, his exemplary behaviour during that sentence and a positive report from the Probation Service convinced her that he was now working hard to prove himself.

While a second offence would normally have incurred a heavy penalty, the Senior Magistrate said that Mr Hawksworth was being offered a chance to show that he could do something about his behaviour, both as a husband and as a father.

Frozen chicken breasts from Chile scarce after factory fire

THE Department of Agriculture is trying to sort out an import problem which has led to a shortage of frozen chicken breasts from Chile on sale in Stanley shops.

Towards the end of last year the Faenadora Sanvicente Ltd plant of Chilean company Agricola Super Ltda, which supplied EU accredited fresh (frozen) chicken for export to the Falkland Islands, was destroyed by fire.

Another company, Agricola Anztia Ltda, has now been sourced to supply poultry to the Falklands. This company, like its predecessor, has EU-accredited slaughter houses, cutting plants and cold stores.

Bio-security Officer Shona Strange said lack of Chilean chicken breasts and fillets for sale lies with the cold storage facilities in Punta Arenas but it is a little unclear as to what the actual problem is. "We do know that since the New Year, SAG (the Chilean food agency) has become more stringent with their regulations regarding cold storage facilities. This has meant the withdrawal of some of the previous cold stores used for products exported to the Falklands."

Ms Strange assured that the Agriculture Department is "actively engaged" in sorting the problem out.

Legislation dictates that all fresh (frozen) meats from domestic cattle, sheep and pigs and poultry must be imported from Chile under licence.

All poultry and other fresh (frozen) meats must be sourced from EU-accredited plants, including slaughtering houses, cutting plants and cold stores.

EARLY March 1982 saw concern in Stanley over unusual Argentine air activity.

Unidentified aircraft were seen flying slowly over the town on several days and an unannounced landing of an Argentine C-130 was made at Stanley Airport. (Although it was decided this was the result of a genuine emergency, the Foreign and Commonwealth Office commented that it showed. "how easily the Argentines could, if they wished, mount an attack on the Islands.")

In the middle of the month, Argentine scrap metal merchant Constantino Davidoff had informed the British Embassy in Buenos Aires that his men would be salvaging scrap from the old whaling station at Leith, South Georgia, and would be transported there by the Argentine Navy.

He was reminded of the importance of following proper port of entry procedures at King Edward Point.

Shackleton moves to South Africa for re-supply

THE British Antarctic Survey ship, *Ernest Shackleton*, will be in Stanley this weekend on her final visit to the Falklands for two years.

As work begins on the new Halley VI station next season the Shackleton will be re-supplying from Cape Town. Athena Dinar of BAS said this is because most of the materials will be sourced in South Africa. It is "definitely not" the last time Shackleton will be in Stanley

though, Athena said, adding, "There will be a gap for a season but no plans are yet decided for the 2008/09 season."

The RRS James Clark Ross will be in Stanley as normal.

tary arms. There was no apology, but the FCO appeared to understand that the landing party would also be removed. The ship was seen leaving the next day, but left behind 29 of the salvage workers. *Endurance* was instructed to resume normal duties.

A statement from the British government on the 22nd led to a strong reaction in the British press while a reply communique from the Argentines stated that the workers were in Leith under a valid contract.

Just one of several individuals suspicious about the Argentines' behaviour was Captain Nick Barker of *Endurance*, who reminded London that the Argentine ship had maintained strict radio silence on its journey to Leith and believed that the incident had "all the trappings of a cunning plot". Late on the 22^{nd} , BAS confirmed

Late on the 22^{ml}, BAS confirmed there were still Argentines at Leith. *Endurance* was directed to Grytviken. Instructions were given the next day as to how to remove the Argentines should it become necessary – giving no opportunity for the Argentine government to "over-dramatise" the incident.

With Endurance occupied, it was arranged for the RRS John Biscoe to transport the new detachment of Royal Marines (due to replace the current garrison) from Montevideo to Stanley.

Hoping for a quick compromise, Lord Carrington sent a message to the Argentines on the 23nd

He stated that, "in view of the high emotional tone," the incident had created in the UK, it was now essential for the Argentine personnel still at Leith to be, "evacuated promptly." If this could be done, HMS Endurance would not be necessary, if not, there would be no alternative but to proceed. He stated: "Our principal objective now is to avoid that this issue should gain political momentum."

The same day, at the Argentine Junta's weekly meeting, the decision was taken to protect the workers on South Georgia and the ice patrol ship *Bahia Paraiso* was ordered to take marines to Leith.

(Coincidentally, it turned out that *Bahia Paraiso* had sailed to collect these marines from Southern Thule just as Davidoff's men were being landed on South Georgia).

Beaver Island invasive species work advances with OTEP help

PLANS to restore some of the Falklands' offshore islands to their original state by providing wildlife with predator-free habitats took a significant leap forward this month.

The Foreign and Commonwealth Office's (FCO) Overseas Territories Environment Programme (OTEP) awarded two years' of funding to a project that aims to clear rats and Patagonian foxes from a number of tussac islands on West Falklands.

The Beaver Island Group Restoration Project, developed by Sally Poncet for Beaver Island Farm, was presented to the government's Environmental Committee last year.

Starter funds from the Environmental Planning Department's Conservation Budget helped get the project underway, with advice from Derek Brown, a New Zealand restoration specialist currently working with South Georgia Habitat Restoration Officer Darren Christie on South Georgia invasive species projects.

Eight islands in the Beaver Island group have been earmarked for eradication. They include Tea, Little Coffin, Skull Bay, Channel Islands, Governor, Green, and Stickin-the-Mud. ranging in size from four to three hundred hectares. The project is to be run by Beaver Island Farm, and baiting for rats will start this winter, and continue in winter 2008. The OTEP funds include provision for labour costs to employ local people under contract to lay the bait, with training given on the job.

Sally Poncet said links have already been established with a number of local conservation bodies: "Falklands Conservation has provided the rat bait; the Antarctic Research Trust is funding wildlife and habitat surveys pre- and postbatting. Private donations have been received for local shipping expenses, and local business Synergy Information Systems is offering media and IT resources.

"The remaining components of this £64,000 project will be covered by OTEP funding."

Eradication is a costly and timeconsuming process and Sally says success requires meticulous planning and 100% commitment from coordinators and fieldworkers.

"Close collaboration with FIG's Environmental Officer Helen Otley. Klemens Putz of the ART, the RSPB's Invasive Species regional officer Brian Summers and Falklands Conservation, will ensure that this substantial overseas investment in Falklands' wildlife and the local economy will be well looked after."

Police Committee discusses Chief's recruitment

THE recruitment of the new Chief Police Officer was discussed at a meeting of the Police Committee held last week.

The Chief Executive Chris Simpkins told the committee that the post had been advertised locally and was due to be advertised in the UK this week. The Chief Executive said that FIG would be looking to secure the assistance of a senior officer from the Devon and Cornwall police force to assist in the recruitment process.

Councillor Richard Cockwell raised the issue of the difference in pay offered in the local advertisement of between £37,000 and £55,500 and the amount offered in the UK advertisement of £62,000 plus benefits. The Chief Executive explained that the difterence was due to the 25% gratuity an overseas applicant would receive and that FIG had found previously that this type of wording led to a greater number of applicants. Mr Simpkins estimated that if an overseas candidate were to be successful he imagined they might be in post by August of September.

Councillor Mike Rendell said that he would have liked to have seen community policing listed as one of the key accountabilities in the post. Governor Alan Huckle assured Councillor Rendell that it would be taken into account during the interview process. *FIRS*

Your questions answered

Q IF A tourist on a day visit is caught stealing or breaking the law, can they be charged and prosecuted then returned to their ship? Or is the transgression ignored due to the short time they are ashore?

A Inspector Len McGill answered this question.

The question implies that the person concerned has been positively identified committing an offence that is not a minor transgression.

The investigation file, which would be prepared by the Royal Falkland Islands Police, would be submitted to the Attorney Generals Chambers, the prosecuting authority in the Falkland Islands, for consideration and direction. Reports of tourists committing offences are not ignored due to the perpetrators short stay in the Falklands.

They are investigated, in accordance with the law, and action taken as appropriate.

Q WITH all these people studying penguins, can anyone tell me what the survival rate was this year for Magellanic penguins in the Falklands?

A Grant Munro, Director of Falklands Conservation, provided this reply.

The scabird monitoring programme of Falklands Conservation undertakes annual monitoring and a five-yearly census of king penguin, rockhopper penguin and gentoo penguin.

At present an assessment of the annual breeding success of Magellanic penguins is not conducted. Due to the widespread, lowdensity distribution of Magellanic Penguins in the Falklands and their burrow-nesting habit, any assessment of trends in population size and breeding success are difficult to obtain.

Unlike counting the discrete colonics of other penguin species it is necessary to count restricted sample plots, which do not necessarily represent the entire population. The tendency of birds to move

The tendency of birds to move burrow between years caused pairs to move in and out of historic sample plots and the resultant high annual variation masked trends. It is difficult to determine whether counted numbers reflect a true difference in numbers between years or just a movement of the birds along the coast.

I SHOULD like to make a suggestion for improving the present ferry service which I believe would have great general benefit.

I am sure it would be far more convenient to most people if the ferry ran on Thursday and Sunday. Also for the winter, or until the new ferry is in service, it should revert to once every two weeks. I think this will have the following advantages.

I have two disappointments from this time, one was not finding the time to make contact with a family on the Islands who shared my surname and wondering whether there was any long-lost ancestry between us.

Also I was moved by the HMS Coventry memorial, which I was able to fly out to on the anniversary of its loss and lay a wreath. I stood on the hillside looking down towards a settlement and wished I could share my experiences with the residents and tell them what the memorial meant to me. When the helicopter took off I noticed a Land Rover making its way up from the settlement and wondered if bad timing had deprived me of this encounter.

I have no regrets and would gladly do it all again. I would have loved to have returned once more to the Islands for this year's celebrations but as I seldom have contact with the Royal Navy these days I wouldn't have a clue how to go about it.

No doubt, since the opening of the base at Mount Pleasant, things will have settled down and tranquility has returned to Stanley once more.



Communication key to better doctor visits

BETTER communication between the hospital and FIGAS may be the key to avoiding the difficulties over medical flights that have recently been experienced.

This was the conclusion ar-rived at in the most recent meeting of the Health and Social Services Committee (HSSC), which had invited the General Manager of FIGAS, Fraser Wallace, to discuss an apparent lack of priority given by FIGAS to routine medical flights.

Senior Medical Officer, Dr Roger Diggle, opened his remarks by stating that. "In general the service from FIGAS is outstanding," but asked whether the priority for routine flights for doctors visits could be re-assessed to avoid recently experienced cancellations.

The Medical Department, he said, accepted that sometimes inelement weather or mechanical problems would interfere with schedules and that, if a routine doctor's visit did not happen, there would normally be no immediate harm suffered by patients. However, such visits were hard to reschedule and create a "knock-on" effect

This view was echoed by Health and Social Services Director, Nikki Osborne, who said that when medical visits were cancelled at short notice, it was difficult for doctors to make the most efficient use of the time they then had on their hands; they were simply "not able to do as much as they would like.

Fraser Wallace denied the assertion made by Dr Diggle that requests for medical flights were usually in place in plenty of time, saying that, "nine times out of ten. we don't know what we are doing on Tuesday, till mid-day on Monday." The problem was particularly acute in the summer, he said, when local demand for flights had to be accommodated alongside tourism bookings, often made a year in advance.

Part of the problem, the Committee learned from Nikki Osborne, was the late response from settlements, when asked if a doctor's visit was necessary

It was agreed unanimously that an earlier response requirement from settlements, with a possible cut-off point, would go some way to enabling the KEMH to convey their requirements to FIGAS in a timely manner.

Also discussed was the possibility of more flexibility in the planning of routine doctors' visits, which currently take place usually on Tuesdays or Wednesdays.

The committee responded positively to a suggestion from the FIGAS Manager that he should send them advance warnings of likely periods when the quantity of other bookings might make difficult the provision of an aircraft for a routine medical flight.

The committee was informed that the routine sending of a copy of their intended doctors' visit rota to FIGAS by the hospital had been abandoned due to the amount of changes that had been found necessary. It was agreed that this practice should be resumed.

Councillor Richard Cockwell said that the issue of routine medical visits was one which needed to be fed into the whole transport review process and asked whether the existence of a road network did not make possible the need for fewer flights. He wondered whether it was not "very much a luxury" for people in Camp to expect always to have the doctor visit them in their home.

Regional grouping of patients for doctors' visits was already a common occurrence on East Falklands, said Dr Diggle, but he was aware of the inconvenience that might be caused to someone who merely required a routine treatment taking minutes to administer, but had to make a journey which might be hours long.



THE third annual Stanley Marathon has been judged the hardest - and most rewarding - after runners battled gale force winds to complete the 26-mile course in the Standard Chartered Bank-sponsored event.

Hot favourite to win after his comfortable victory in the Cape Pembroke Half Marathon, Hugh Marsden didn't disappoint, crossing the finish line just a minute slower than his last year's time. Wool market report for week ending March 16, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices increased across the entire micron spectrum at sales in Australia and South Africa last week.

As shown in the attached Micron Price Guide, fleece wool lots finer than 26 micron increased in value by between 2 and 21 pence per kilogram clean while broader lots increased in value by 1 penny per kilogram clean.

per kilogram clean. The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up almost 13 pence per kilogram clean at 392.7 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 380.2 pence per kilogram clean.

Buying interest was reported to be quite widespread in both South Africa and Australia with strong Asian and European demand.

In South Africa 99% of the 10,227 bale offering was cleared, while in Australia 90% of the 50,815 bales presented to the trade changed hands.

Next week approximately 63,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in Australia. No sales are

scheduled for South Africa or New Zealand.





THE move by Argentina to end the joint hydrocarbons understanding with the United Kingdom has not come as a surprise to Falklands councillors.

"We have been expecting them to take some kind of action in this sensitive year of the 25th anniversary of the conflict," Councillor Andrea Clausen told *Pengum News*.

Argentine Foreign Minister, Jorge Taiana, announced the decision this week, blaming British "unilateral" actions such as oil exploration in "disputed" areas "belonging to the Argentine continental platform."

Councillor Clausen said the agreement, which was signed between Argentina and the UK on September 27, 1995, has in fact been non-functioning since 2000/ 01, "...and so the denouncement of it will have no practical effect for the Falkland Islands." Nor should it have any effect on the future of the hydrocarbons industry in the Falklands, she said, "...as the agreement was principally to do with the Special Area of Co-operation.

"The denouncement of the agreement means that this area no longer exists. It does not affect hy-

drocarbon activity in the rest of the FICZ or FOCZ."

Nevertheless, Cllr Clausen said she was "sad" that Argentina is again taking action against the Falkland Islands which is in contrast to the spirit of co-operation. "It is sensible for such close

"It is sensible for such close neighbours to communicate on areas of mutual interest (under the sovereignty umbrella); this is clearly a re-buff of such a sentiment," she commented.

The Foreign Office described the Argentine move as "a backward step." Acting Governor, Harriet Hall, commented, "It sends a very negative political signal and we want a full and constructive relationship with Argentina."

Argentine commemoration

Ms Hall said the UK has always been committed to commemorating the conflict in a "fitting and respectful" manner which respects the fallen on both sides.

Tying in with this, the Falkland Islands Government announced this week it has agreed that, following discussions between the British Embassy in Buenos Aires and the Argentine Families Commission, more than 600 next of kin will visit the cemetery at Darwin later this year.

Councillor Mike Summers said that in the discussions to date with the Embassy this has not been styled as an "official inauguration", but as an event to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the war, and for families to visit the war graves of their loved ones.

"It would be our intention that the event is non-political," he said, confirming that it is not intended that there will be any officials from the Argentine government or politicians joining the visit. There will, however, be officials of the Families Commission who also came here some time ago.

The planning of the visit is still underway and numbers have not yet been finalised, however Cllr Summers said the Families Commission is talking about coming by sea with numbers of "600+".

The sea journey is necessary because charter flights to the Falklands are banned by Argentina.

Councillor Richard Cockwell said the planned visit was intended to provide, "...a dignified, fitting and private commemoration by the families of the Argentine armed forces who died in the conflict."

'Commemorate and celebrate'

A SERIES of celebratory events are being organised for mid-June, to tie in with the commemorations which will mark the anniversary of the end of the Falklands War.

All the events are being funded by the government and organised by SeAled PR.

Top of the bill is a Liberation Ball, a family event open to everyone aged from school year seven and above, which will be held in the FIDF Hall on the evening of Saturday. June 16. A free bar and buffet will be provided and 'Miss and Master Falklands 25' will be crowned on the night.

At the same time, a gala dinner for invited guests and visiting VIPs will take place in the Town Hall. Four of the eight councillors will attend this, and the other four will attend the Liberation Ball.

Before the two events begin, a fireworks display will be held at around 5pm which will tie in with a commemorative balloon release.

During the day on Saturday, June 16 a Falklands Expo is planned to take place in the Community School, giving people from all areas - such as voluntary groups, private sector companies and government departments - the chance to showcase what they have achieved over the past 25 years.

Sarah Clement of ScAled PR said the Expo - which is also being funded by the government and supported by the Tourist Board - is open to anyone who wishes to participate: "It's a platform to show the world-wide media what we've achieved and what we hope to achieve. Anyone who wants to get involved - whether your organisation is big or small - please get in touch."

As usual, the annual civic reception will be held after the Parade and Freedom March on Liberation Day, June 14 and everyone is welcome to attend.

The kids will not miss out, as a party is being organised for the afternoon of June 14. Themed, 'A Charlie and the Chocolate Factory Fest', government insurers HSBC has donated £1,000 towards the party, and FIG is funding the rest.

The party is open to all school children and will take place in the Leisure Centre from 4-6pm. The only rule is that under eights must be accompanied by a parent or guardian aged over 16.

Given the fact that there are thousands of journalists out there, each of whom wants to speak to a Falkland Islander around this time, it boils down to quite a high level of individual attention. Hang on in there chaps, I am sure it will ease off in about 76 days time.

Housing tops public meeting agenda

BUILDING up Stanley through infill housing is generally acceptable to the community, as long as the sewers can cope and adequate green areas are left in place.

Following a presentation on the government's housing strategy given by the Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins, at the public meeting on Monday, the gathering were then asked for their views, in particular on building houses on 'infill' plots.

Mr Simpkins explained that a year ago 270 individual plots within the town were identified as possible sites for building one or more houses on. He emphasised that the plots may or may not be suitable for housing and some of the land owners may not want to sell.

New plots cost more than £50,000 to service and it is considered a cheaper option to build within Stanley where services can more cost-effectively be utilised.

There has been little if any interest from developers in plots offered for more than one house near Ten Acres and more recently at Hansen Hill and Lellman Way, councillors said. This prompted a member of the public to ask whether those on the waiting list for land would be offered the plots.

Councillors suggested that people on the waiting list should get together to tender for the land but that there were no plans to offer to individuals at present. If there were no offers made by groups then the option may be considered, said Cllr Summers.

Individuals getting together and sourcing plots where power and water is available is a popular option with councillors and the public. An initiative used at Mountain View by a group to obtain land and build a series of houses was cited as a success and land on the route to the abattoir was suggested as a possibility for future housing by a member of the public, as limited services are already in place. Councillor Davies said they would be willing to "look along those lines."

Concerns over houses being squeezed onto small plots were expressed and Councillor Summers said that he was grateful to former building advisor Graham France for drawing his attention to the 1998 ExCo agreed parameters of .15 of an acre being a minimum sized plot with not more than 25% of the land covered.

Caution

Higher housing density needs to be treated with caution was the message from several members of the public at the meeting. Alison Inglis used Rowlands Rise as a good example of higher density housing that does not feel overly crowded.

Government Archivist Jane Cameron urged councillors to preserve part of the old town with tourism in mind. "Make the planning process work effectively," was her advice.

With regard to keeping green areas in town, Cllr Janet Robertson said that it was down to what is considered "aesthetically pleasing" to individuals. She said that while some might consider abandoned yards to be easy on the eye others might appreciate a tidy property with a house on it.

Councillors and the Chief Executive stressed that their main aim is to find ways to develop housing plots without causing house prices to escalate.

Increased mortgages

Standard Chartered Bank Manager, Nick Hutton told the public meeting that he and the government are working on enhancing the present mortgage scheme.

It is hoped that from July 1, loans will increase from three to four times the borrowers' annual income for the purpose of building new houses. This will not apply to existing buildings however, said Mr Hutton and loans will be justified on income, not proposed rent or income from the building

Scaffolding will come off monument for service

THE scaffolding which currently surrounds tĥe Liberation Monument will be removed for the special parade taking place on Sunday.

Veterans from the Defence Force (FIDF) who were called out on the night of the Argentine invasion are to hold commemorations at the monument on Sunday afternoon. However, the monument is under refurbishment and is surrounded by scaffolding.

Director of Public Works, Manfred Keenleyside confirmed on Wednesday that members of the FIDF would be removing it for the service then re-erecting it afterwards.

Some people have complained about the timing of the refurbish-ment, however Mr Keenleyside said a number of targets must be met for the commemorative events in 2007. "My view was that the later we did the work to the Liberation Monument the more pristine it would be for June 14, which is when the greatest attention will be focused upon it.

"We have also had in train other

things that needed the skills of Rob Yssel, one of which is the Atlantic Conveyor memorial which we have been trying to get completed before getting it down to Cape Pembroke becomes too problematic.

George Burroughs, PWD Maintenance Manager explained the work that Mr Yssel is carrying out on the Liberation Monument. "Some of the pointing has become dislodged between the joints in the ashlar facing panels and an unsightly green stain from the copper/bronze clamps is discolouring

"We intend to draw out these stains with a clay poultice and then re-point the joints using a naturally hydraulic lime mortar.

In addition to this, a further four names are to be added to the units/ squadrons that took part in the war and the letters will be re-gilded with an acrylic gold size (adhesive) and 23 ¾ Carat Gold leaf.

If time allows, Mr Burroughs added, bronze powder will be applied to the laurel on the north elevation.

Students and staff to skip for health | No Place to go for young people

THE Pupils and staff of the Infant and Junior School (US) have been training hard for a British Heart Foundation (BHF) Jump Off, which is being held on Thursday in the school hall.

Three inquests held in the Coroner's Court

THE discovery of a further body in Stanley harbour on the afternoon of Thursday, March 22, and a sudden death at Mount Pleasant, the following morning, created a busy day in Stanley Coroner's Court, with three cases opened and then adjourned

The first inquest concerned the body of a male person, still unidentified, found in Stanley harbour on the evening of March 14 and the second, that of another male person, found in the same location, eight days later

Details of the discovery of the bodies were supplied to the court by Sergeant David Roberts Both bodtes, which are believed to be those of missing crewmen from the Taiwanesse jigger Jih Da Gan, are to be sent to the John Radeliffe hospital in Oxforshire for identification

Falkland Islands Coroner, Clare Faulds said that this process, which was to be carried out by arrangement with the Oxfordshire Coroner, would be helped by the fact that identification cards were found among the effects attached to the more recently recovered body.

The court was shown passports belonging to Jih Da Gan crew members Helmiawan Hairi and Ahmad Yani, both Indonesian nationals, aged twenty, who were among the group of ten who jumped from the vessel and have since been regarded as missing, presumed dead

An inquest into the death of Hugh Black (60) at Mount Pleasant was also opened and adjourned pending the pathologist's examination

THE Place, a building set aside for young people to meet in, is to be closed because of vandalism.

Following a meeting of the trustees, Tim Simpson said the decision had been made following "stupid, pointless vandalism" which had culminated in the breaking of the toilet for which the costs to repair were mounting.

Mrs Simpson, who has supported the concept of The Place throughout, said the trustees have always been aware of the shortcomings of the The Place, the main one being the size of it meaning that it could not feasibly be supervised other than by the police dropping in now and then.

"The fact remains that we have managed to keep it going for over two years and if it hadn't been for the sheer stupidity and selfishness of a very few, the trustees would still feel able to maintain their support," said Mrs Simpson.

"We do feel that this shows clearly the need for a Community Centre which will provide somewhere

for all, not just our young folk, to go to on an evening/weekend," she said.

The young need to be unobtrusively supervised. "...where any misbehaviour would be noticed and the perpetrators dealt with properly, said Mrs Simpson, adding that perhaps it was too much to expect the young people's Place Committee to be able to stop their peers from causing trouble even though they had the backing of the trustees and the police across the road.

Mrs Simpson remains clear on the point that there is a need for somewhere for the young people to go however.

"When we had to close The Place some time ago for repairs to be made the police remarked on the difference it made to the number of youngsters out on the streets again.

"We do of course realise that there will always be some young on the streets at night, that's the nature of teenagers, but somewhere to go is, I feel, a right for them," she concluded.

Diplomacy begins, in an attempt to avoid military action

MARCH 24

HMS Endurance arrived at Grytviken, and was told not to enter nor conduct any naval operations in the vicinity of Leith. Meanwhile the Bahia Paraiso landed Lt. Alfredo Astiz and ten men at Leith (at the time Astiz was wanted by Sweden and France for the murder of a girl and three nuns at a naval interrogation centre during the dirty war).

Two Argentine missile-carrying corvettes. *Granville* and *Drummond*, were ordered to position themselves between the Falklands and South Georgia and the Junta asked for plans for the occupation of the Islands to be brought forward.

MARCH 25

Bahia Paraiso was reported at Leith; three landing craft and a military helicopter were spotted.

Speaking to the Cabinet, Lord Carrington described Davidoff as an "agent provocateur for the Argentine Government." He explained that Endurance could repatriate the men left on South Georgia, but warned of a risk that the ship might be intercepted or of some "counter-action against the Falkland Islands..." Efforts were still being made to persuade the Argentine Government to arrange for the departure of the men.

One suggested solution involved issuing Davidoff's men with suitable documentation - this might mean having their white cards stamped. Governor Hunt realised this would be seen in the Falklands as implying that Argentina had a right to enter the Dependecies without observing normal immigration regulations and would, "go down like a lead balloon".

Passports could be stamped or temporary identity certificates issued by the Base Commander, but Hunt stated "Proper documentation does not (repeat not) mean stamping of white cards." When told that the party would be given the necessary documentation if they went to Grytviken. Costa Mendez said that

the Argentine President would be consulted - no reply was ever received.

MARCH 26

At 7.15pm (Argentina) the Junta decided to order the occupation of the Falklands. Chiefs of Staff confirmed that an invasion of the Islands could be mounted at once.

The operation was planned for the evening of April 1 at the earliest and could be called off as late as 6pm on March 31. Orders were given for a force to sail on March 28 and move into an intermediate area before turning towards the lslands. The rest of the fleet would remain at a distance to protect the expedition.

Around this time the British Commander in Chief Fleet (CINCFLEET) earmarked the first extra ships for possible deployment to the South Atlantic. At the time a substantial number of ships were exercising near Gibraltar under Rear Admiral Sir John "Sandy" Woodward.

MARCH 27

Costa Mendez issued a press statement stating that, "a firm decision has been taken to give the men on South Georgia all necessary diplomatic protection." This was not diplomatic only, he said, since there was a navy ship in the area to provide any necessary protection.

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nar.com.ar) Ambassador Williams acknowledged his, "growing impression that Costa Mendez has been less than honest with me..." He was unable to, "...discount the possibility that any action on our part to disturb the Argentine working party.... will be taken as a trigger for armed ac-

tion by the Argentines." An Argentine naval exercise was known to have started on March 24, well north of the Islands. After March 27 there was no evidence of exercise activity, although ships remained at sea. Defence Intelligence Staff reported no subinarines at Mar del Plata naval base.

MARCH 28

Argentina continued to refuse to remove the working party and claimed Britain had reacted in a way which constituted a "virtual ultimatum backed by the threat of military action in the form of dispatch of the Naval warship *Endurance*..." This, they said, constituted, "a disproportionate and provocative response aggravated for having received wide diffusion in the press..."

Carrington asked US Secretary of State, Alexander Haig, to assist in finding a compromise. The next day, Deputy Secretary of State, Walter Stroessel, met separately with the British and Argentine ambassadors in Washington and counselled both governments to exercise restraint, but said the US would not take sides.

MARCH 29

A nuclear powered submarine, HMS Spartan, was prepared for deployment. It was later decided that HMS Splendid should also be sent. These moves were intended to be covert so as not to appear provocative, but the following day the deployment was leaked. A third SSN, Superb, had been withdrawn from Exercise Sringtrain on March 26 and it was incorrectly assumed by the press that this was now on its way to the South Atlantic.

The decision was made to keep both detachments of Royal Marines on the Islands until the situation was resolved.

MARCH 30

Williams' latest report from Buenos Aires did not suggest a need for panic. The situation was judged to be serious but not necessarily moving to a head.

Concerned there could be pressure from die-hards to "capitalise on the South Georgia issue to resolve the whole Falklands issue by force," Carrington decided to send an envoy to Argentina.

The Defence Operations Executive (DOE) held its first South Atlantic crisis meeting.

Endurance was ordered back to Stanley and put ashore her 22 Royal Marines with orders to maintain a British presence on the Islands, protect BAS personnel and observe the Argentines at Leith.

Wool Company customers satisfied with service received

AFTER a somewhat turbulent start, four months into the operation of the Wool Company, its members seem satisfied with the service they have received.

Penguin News contacted a number of farmers who have signed up to the Wool Company and all were positive.

Manager of the company. David Lambert said he was unwilling to comment specifically on prices and speed of payment as this is confidential to the farmer. The same applies at this stage to new mar-kets, he said, adding, "...although we have some I am not going to be specific at this time."

There will be a full review for members of the Wool Company and for the government after the end of the season, which will subsequently be made available in some form to prospective new members of the company and the press to show how joining the company would have affected farmers' cash receipts

When asked how the Company was performing. Mr Lambert commented, "A review at this stage when we are just four months into selling is rather premature.

However, he did say, "In a nutshell I am happy with the way things have progressed generally, sale prices on average are good with prices achieved in the coarser end of the market very good in general. Money is flowing very nicely into farms with only a few lots shipped

last week that have been sold but are yet to be paid for.

Over £500,000 has so far been paid out from wool receipts to our members. Typically farmers are paid in full within a couple of weeks of wool arriving and many have been paid earlier, even whilst the wool was still on the vessel."

Falkland Landholdings (FLH) joining the company was a deciding factor as to whether it would become established and are, at present, satisfied with the speed of payments and prices received.

Given that FLH has only sold 40% of its total clip, the majority of which has been fleece wool, and that FLH never expected to be much better off selling fleece wool through the Wool Company, it's too early to make comment on overall performance of the company," said General Manager Owen Summers.

By comparison FLH would have sold a greater proportion of its clip by this time last year, however this is a reflection of a change in shearing policy rather than the performance of the Wool Company," he explained.

Mr Lambert said he looks forward to making new sales in the coming weeks on the ewe wool now arriving at FIPASS and is looking at new strategies for oddments, including processing some within the company which will add value for the farmers concerned, including lotting oddments in a way that will give fair value to farmers with better wool

obtaining a higher price.

This contrasts to a more typical 'blind' lotting process which can be unfair on the better producers as everyone ends up with the same per clean kilo, based on the average yield of the whole," he said.

Cash flow

The Wool Company is working on a strategy to help farmers' cash flow, particularly in the early part of the season, said Mr Lambert.

"It has become very apparent that cash flow on farms, particularly in the start of the season, is extremely tight. On the one hand farms are awaiting wool payments and on the other have to pay shearers, fuel etc.

"Anecdotally we hear some farms receive advances but at very high rates of interest, and, whilst we are unable to confirm or deny this, we see no reason for farmers to pay much interest for a cash advance on a sale (it's their money after all) and we are working to try to get something definite in place in time for a formal announcement in Farmers Week."

West Falkland farmer Peter Robertson from Port Stephens says that he thinks the principle of the Wool Company is sound, particularly now that there is a very much improved shipping service in place. When one considers it was started when the season was already underway, was met with a lot of opposition from folk who did not want change and encountered a se-

rious setback with staff, it is encour-Peter, adding, "Time will tell."

The largest farm on West Falklands, Port Howard, has sold about the same amount of wool that they would expect to by this stage of the season and it looks like overall sales will be up by about 8 - 9%, says joint owner of the farm. Critta Lee. There have been a few minor problems, such as you would expect with a new company, most have been simple misunderstandings that have been taken care of quickly and are unlikely to occur again.

"Ultimately I don't believe that we have made a huge short term gain by joining the wool company but. I firmly believe that the concept behind the Wool Company is right and that it is essential to have as much control over your product as possible. For this the wool com-pany is unrivalled," concluded Mr Lee

Councillor Andrea Clausen says that she remains supportive of the concept of the wool cooperative and, despite its slow and turbulent start, believes that the end goals remain unchanged and achievable.

However, it is down to the newly established Board to ensure that the Company gets up and running and they must illustrate to FIG that they can meet their objectives in order that they can receive the next batch of financial support," she concluded.

THE Falklands amateur dramatic group have reached new levels with their production of Nobody's Perfect appearing at the Town Hall tonight and tomorrow.

Doors open at 7pm and curtain rises at 7.30pm with refreshments available. Because of some risque language the producers feel it will appeal to those from Year 7 and above.



Ernie looks at 'recruitment fiasco'

WITH regard to the recent recruitment fiasco. I wonder if it is realised just what a poor message this sends to the world and the ammunition it gives to the (many) opponents of the Falklands in this world.

I have some experience of recruitment, in some cases at senior level, when I worked for Manchester City Council, though I guess a refresher course would be due by now as some of my knowledge may be a tad out of date. We had a very formal equal op-

portunities policy which on the whole worked very well, though it could be circumvented/manipulated by determined managers but was always open to formal appeal and review.

From this distance it seems that a few questions require an answer regarding equal opportunities and the fairness of recruitment procedures and policies and indeed the transparency of them

It seems that various people are throwing their teddies out of the pram in complete disregard of almost universally recognised procedures. For instance:

I: Have the failed applicants actually formally asked for a review of the outcome and a briefing as to where there was a shortfall in his/ her skills and or experience so he/ she could improve them for his/her next application?

Seems not, though everyone else seems to want to do it for one candidate in one way or another.

2. Was the apparent policy of appointing a suitably qualified and experienced local candidate seriously and formally being operated? It would appear not. In my own

experience if such a policy exists it should be formal and clear. For instance, we had a policy of only accepting candidates for jobs below a certain salary level from within the boundaries of the city.

It was well known that unemployment of unqualified people was high in the city and therefore the majority of the unskilled and low skilled jobs were reserved for residents. In the case of other particular or more senior jobs these could be 'ring fenced' to certain groups or certain departments perhaps where there was a surplus of employees or perhaps a number of similarly qualified people. A very clear policy and with the terms and conditions always clear to applicants in advance.

Also, for the avoidance of doubt and confusion, jobs should have a full description and a full specification of requirements for the post and equally what qualities are required from the applicants should be specified precisely in a Person Specification Therefore when all the boxes are ticked or crossed with reasons given it is perfectly within reason to tell the failed applicant(s) in confidence where they fell down should they ask for a review, and indeed for them to be able to appeal against an adverse result.

Review by public acclamation

(mob rule) is surely not an option. 3. Was the job 'ring fenced' only to suitably qualified and experienced Falkland Islanders in the first instance and, if not, why not?

It seems not, as a Canadian applied and was awarded the post.

4. If you are not seeking the best qualified candidate in the world but the best qualified candidate in the Falklands why advertise worldwide?

Seems obvious to me. 5. Also from this distance it seems that the immigration officer should have no part in the post re-cruitment process surely? If the Canadian was awarded the job as the best qualified and experienced candidate and the recruitment process carried out in a scrupulously fair fashion why is the result any of his business as long as the Canadian fits other criteria for working in the Falklands.

6. Does he even know what was required of the candidates?

Wow, what a mess.

As a retired person with time on my hands I would be quite happy to share my experiences to help prevent a repeat of this fiasco though I emphasise I don't want a job, I am happy in retirement I would certainly have been able to prevent the powers that be getting themselves into this catch 22 situation.

7. Surely a formal process must exist to resolve this?

However, it would require the failed candidate(s) to challenge the result formally and for the panel or an independent adjudicator to revisit this decision as a result

At worst the job could be re-advertised and open to all previous candidates but with a new panel.

8. By the way did the same panel (people) interview both candidates

under the same circumstances? If not the decision cannot nossibly have been an equitable one.

Having said all that I express no preferences as I neither know the

circumstances of either candidate nor the job description nor the person specification, nor was I on the panel Probably just like all your other correspondents.

9 Was the local candidate's experiences what they were looking for

Perhaps not, perhaps that is why they went farther affeld in the first place. Perhaps the Canadian has been eminently successful in attracting thousands of tourists to some out of the way destinations in Canada and they want that skill.

10. The big question is: which candidate is going to bring the best result for the Falklands in terms of tourist development and therefore potential income and job creation?

After all, appointing the best candidate is not necessarily done by taking a vote on who is the most popular person nor is a job award a reward for past efforts, it is the appointment of the best person to do the job in the view of the panel.

My experience tells me that often appointments of this nature are unpopular when there is a well known and respected 'local' candidate who is obviously losing out. But then how do you keep talented and qualified Falkland Islanders on board Falklands PLC?

Perhaps appointing local qualified people by advertising locally without also inviting the world and his best friend would be a start. After all, it is always possible to buy in particular additional skills and experience on a contractual basis as and when required. Sometimes it is necessary to compromise to keep a grip on the larger picture and obiectives

Me, I know nothing, and I remain neutral in this furore - over to you folks.

Aquaculture research station: 'doing the ground work, from farm to fork'

WORK on the new aquaculture research farm is now well underway.

It is an integral part of the three year development programme funded by the government. The facility at Moody Brook is now being transformed from a market garden into a fish farm.

Under the guidance of aquaculture advisor Dr Brendan Gara - who is employed by the Development Corporation (FIDC) - the fish farm now also has three full time employees who will investigate the economic potential of a range of candidate aquaculture species, including sea trout, zebra trout and sea worms.

Fundamentally, the development programme will lay the foundations for the creation of an industry. It will serve solely as a resource for use by commercial organisations, doing the ground work for them. As Brendan Gara says, "You'll never see an 'FIDC fish' for sale - I don't want us to be fish producers. I just want us to help it happen for other people - if it's economically viable."

The farm is being set up at Grandad's Gardens. a series of polytunnels and paddocks which were formerly used by Sam Miller.

The three new employees are site manager. Paul Ellis, scientist Dan Fowler and aquaculture assistant, Antoine Daille. Brendan commented, "They will be carrying out the jobs you would normally do on a fish farm, albeit a very small one, because we're not looking at producing commercially. It's just demonstrating on a very small scale and carrying out the research to tell us how to do things in the Falklands."

He continued. "Their jobs are going to be looking after fish, stock taking, building, experimental work, collecting data from the wild, collecting data from fish in tanks. all those kind of jobs that a much bigger amount of people would do in an established farm."

The team

Paul Ellis admits to having been interested in aquaculture for a number of years; he "dabbled" for a while in crab fishing and has helped Simon Hardcastle of Falklands

Fresh with studies. He will carry out the 'hands on' work at the site, including much of the actual building of the infrastructure.

Microbiologist Dan Fowler worked for the Fisheries Department for a year and a half before taking up his new role. He will not only monitor the health of the fish in the farm but will carry out biotoxin monitoring for food safety and export.

Antoine Daille joins the team this week and, Brendan says, will bring a number of skills useful to fish husbandry.

The staff will be bolstered by students brought in to work in with the programme's themes. Swansea, Portsmouth. Plymouth and Manchester Universities have all shown interest. "They can do the work for us at a very low cost but provide a huge amount of information," Brendan explains.

One of the students lined up to join the farm this winter is Falkland Islander Sam Cockwell who is studying at Manchester University.

Talk of science shouldn't lead people to switch off, Brendan says. "People talk a lot about science in aquaculture and, fair enough, there is science involved. But, at the end of the day, fish farming is being able to look at fish in tanks and to know what's going on. It really is that simple.

"It doesn't matter what fancy piece of kit or fancy computer programme you have, at the end of the day, it's your eyes that tell you what's going on."

Brendan is keen for people to get involved and understand what is happening in the farm and the site will regularly be opened up to the general public to visit. "Because of the nature of the work and research that's going on, we don't want people to just rock up. But there will be particular days when we will open it up for people to come and have a look.

"There are brilliant reasons for showing people what's going on, especially kids: in the future this might be an industry they want to work in. If you can get them enthused about what fish in tanks in a farm situation actually means, then great."

End goals

There is potential under the aquaculture programme for Falklands farmers to begin growing sea worms - which are then used for feed in shrimp farming - and the Moody Brook facility will include ponds used to look at worm growth. "Assuming it all works," Brendan said. "we can then invite farmers who are interested to come and work on the site for a couple of weeks. get used to how we farm these worms in ponds and go off, dig their

own ponds and do it themselves." At the end of the three years,

Brendan plans to have a created a guide to farming fish in the Falklands, "...along with data on what is going on in the environment that is going to be of use in the shelltish industry."

Also of use will be the research into trout - and not just for environmental reasons. "We will be looking at whether we can reintroduce zebra trout around the Islands from a captive breeding programme if that's what people want to do." Brendan says, "and we will look at what the status is of the sea trout stocks.

"If tourism increases, there's going to be increasing pressure on sea trout in the streams and rivers; at the moment there's very little information around, so if we can assist with that and come up with some information on what is actually going on, then that's of real use to the tourism sector for reereational fishers."

He added, "If people are interested in getting involved, there's lots of ways in which they can be. We want to talk to the river owners and the fishing clubs because we don't want to be doing this in isolation - we want their information, after all, they are the people that currently know everything that's going on."

The aquaculture project will examine the economic challenges of fish farming - "We have to look at everything, from the farm to the fork, and find out where we have margins," Brendan says, admitting that, in the end, fish farming may be deemed more expensive than it is worth.

However, even if everything fails, and there is no good reason to farm fish in the Falklands, Brendan is still upbeat: "There will still be a lot of useful information that will come out of this for the general social and environmental wellbeing of the Falklands.

"It's not about just aquaculture: you've got to look at it as more, that we're able to provide a huge amount of information for a wide range of people and groups around the Falklands."

'82 guest returns to say 'thanks' Steve completes fisheries colle

WHEN, like many other Islanders, Hilary and Romeo Pauloni opened their home to members of the British Forces in 1982, little did have know what a lasting impression their hospitality made.

For, twenty-five years later, one of the men they fed and sheltered after the war has tracked them down and presented them with a gift.

Ade Thorne was a 21 year old technician, who was part of an eleven man RAF Bomb Disposal team from RAF Wittering that arrived in Ajax Bay on the RFA *Sir Belvidere* on May 22, 1982.

They spent the next week dealing with unexploded bombs in the refrigeration plant at Ajax Bay and on the ships in San Carlos waters.

After the fall of Goose Green they moved forward by Chinook and were put up in the old school house in the settlement, where they remained for around two weeks, clearing up unexploded bombs from the airfield and Darwin areas, Argentine weaponry taken from the POW's and items such as napalm which had been left in sheds. They moved back to Ajax Bay on June 12 and sailed around to Stanley on the MV *Elk*.

Ade is now serving at Mount Pleasant and visited Hilary and Romeo at their home last week to thank them for taking in him and five of his colleagues in 1982.

He recalls, "My boss Flt Lt Al Swan had flown forward by helicopter on the 15th and proceeded to knock on doors asking if anybody could look after his team when we arrived.

"On knocking on Romeo's door he was told, 'we can put up six of you, but all we can provide is a roof over your heads - we have no food or water.' So of course he said that would be great.

"When we arrived 1 stayed at their house as one of the six and the other five stayed somewhere else on Fitzroy Rd."

Being a Bomb Disposal team the men were asked to search the FIC

buildings for possible booby traps which they did and. Ade sheepishly said, "...unfortunately some food (such as flour, tins, etc) and other supplementary items such as toilet roll had to be taken away for further examination at Fitzroy Road under the cover of darkness.

"We basically begged and borrowed whatever we could to provide them with some basics, including digging peat for the cooker and fire."


When the men returned to the house each day, Ade said, Hilary always had the kettle on and snacks waiting. "She also made a birthday cake for one of my mates who had his 21st birthday."

The six set sail for the UK on June 30 and were replaced by another RAF bomb disposal team shortly after.

On this, his first trip back to the Falklands since 1982. Ade presented Romeo and Hilary with a plaque and some photographs from 1982.

The inscription on the plaque reads: "To Hilary and Romeo, thank you from RAF Bomb Disposal, June 1982."

"This is to thank them for looking after us back in 1982," he said. "It's a bit late, I know, but better late than never."

The moonfish took around three weeks for Steve to produce.

Describing the process, he said, "Silicone rubber moulds are taken of the original fish. That's then filled with polyester resin which you



build up like you build a kayak. "Then, when you've taken the mould away, you paint the cast. That's pretty much it."





Q AFTER the marathon on Sunday the runners were given a Mars Bar as it was considered that a sugar boost was beneficial after exercise.

Why is chocolate not allowed to be sold either in the Community School or the Leisure Centre? Who made the decision and on what grounds?

A Leisure Centre Manager, Steve Dent responded, "There has been a long standing 'unwritten' policy within the Leisure Centre not to sell heavy sugar based drinks and snack bars within the centre's reception area. With this, the emphasis was placed on chocolate based products with no actual regard to the sugar or fat content of any product being sold.

"This policy was in place before my tenure as Manager and had somewhat slipped, over time, prior to the most recent election.

"On the initial visit by the two Education councillors I was instructed to cease selling chocolate based products and crisps, this was done immediately.

"There is much debate to be had with regard to the sugar and fat content of so called 'health bars' and the benefits of a 'sugar fix' immediately following exercise."

Katherine Nelson. Acting Headteacher at the Community School added. "Some time ago a Home Economics teacher was asked to review the products on sale in the school tuck-shop.

"It was felt that her qualifications, that centred upon nutrition, would assist the school in helping pupils make healthy choices. Her experience led her to believe that food high in both fat and sugar content should not be offered to pupils as a supplement to that provided by their parents. Consequently chocolate, which falls into this category, was removed from sale. "It is worth noting that, while we believe that we are acting in the best interests of our pupils health, we do not dictate what is brought into school provided it is legal!"

Q IF YOU pay for an eye test at the KEMH, can you ask for a copy of your prescription for glasses or does it belong to the hospital (FIG)?

A Director of Health, Nikki Osborne, replied, "Anyone who has an eye test in the hospital is quite entitled to ask for a copy of their prescription. Indeed, many patients do, and purchase their own spectacles, either whilst abroad or over the internet."

Q WHY do we celebrate Commonwealth Day when we are not members of the Commonwealth?

A Acting Governor, Harriet Hall responded to this question.

The Falkland Islands is an Associate member of the Commonwealth by virtue of its links with the UK.

Councillors take part in meetings of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Assembly and have also hosted a Conference of their regional grouping here in the Falklands. We do not mark Commonwealth Day with any Island-wide event, although HE The Governor traditionally reads HM The Queen's message to the Commonwealth at an assembly in the Community School.

Q THE museum has many valuable items in it scollection, most of them donated by residents. What is the total value of the collection and what value is it insured for?

A Museum Manager, Leona

Roberts, provided this response.

The museum has a wonderful and eclectic collection and this is certainly due to the generosity of residents over the years.

The total value of the collection is unknown and I am unaware of any of the items in the museum ever having been inspected or assessed for this purpose. I understand that a number of years ago a policy decision was made by the then curator and trustees of the Museum and National Trust (M&NT) that - in line with many UK museums and galleries - the collection would not be insured and this policy remains in place. This may seem surprising, but there are several reasons for this:

1) Objects would need to be valued and who in the Islands has the expertise to do this?

2) Potentially, the cost of insuring items would be beyond the M&NT's means

3) The majority of the items in the Britannia House are irreplaceable. Should (God forbid) the collection be lost to fire or other disaster, the items could not be replaced (with money) – if an identical item were to be sourced in the UK or elsewhere and purchased, it would not have the Falkland Island connection and would therefore have no place in our museum.

Many of the objects in the museum could indeed be found elsewhere, but it is the fact that they have made it to, or been made in, our corner of the world that makes them special to us.

However, any object that is loaned to the museum may be insured by the lender themselves. The M&NT's position with regards to insurance is made clear on the Loan Form and the lender is asked if they have insured the item.

Q WHY was the salary for the

FIGAS Manager advertised at £32,026 locally and circa £62,000 internationally (*Flight Magazine*)?

Does this £62,000 include 25% gratuity? Would education and medical treatment of dependants, not mentioned in the list of benefits but enjoyed by other contract officers and residents, also be on top of the £62,000?

Does the £62,000 relate to the whole two year contract or is it an annual salary?

We hear of recruitment difficulties relating to dentists, nurses, teachers, etc. Are these posts also advertised internationally at virtually double the salary?

A Director of Human Resources, Kathleen Dobbyns, kindly provided the following response.

The post of GM FIGAS was advertised locally stating the salary for the post was in Grade A which commences at £37,006 per annum. (please note - £37,026 not £32,026 as quoted above).

This grade extends to £55,584 per annum (though this was not detailed in the local advert). In addition to salary, a local appointee would receive occupational pension contributions at the rate of 10% of basic salary, and would be entitled to free health and education services in so far as those services are normally provided free of charge to local residents.

The overseas advertisement quotes a package worth circa £62,000 plus benefits. £62,000 is the annual salary within Grade A inclusive of the 25% gratuity which is offered to overseas appointees in lieu of occupational pension contributions, and partly as compensation for lack of long term employment opportunities/ risk of a period of unemployment at the end of the contract.

The contract officer/family would be entitled to the same free health and education services as a locally appointed person.

FIG does have difficulty in recruiting quality professional staff to fill vacancies that cannot be filled locally. Government is not advertising these posts overseas at "virtually double the salary" of the local advertisement.

Sometimes, as in the case of the GM FIGAS, the overseas advertisements show a financial package which is annual salary inclusive of gratuity. All posts recruited from overseas offer salaries within the grade for the post.

FIG does not offer any salary supplements to overseas officers, they are paid within the same grade range as a locally appointed person doing the same job would be and they receive a gratuity instead of pension contributions.

Lord Carrington speaks out

NEWSPAPERS world-wide are carrying stories of the Falkands invasion by Argentine forces 25 years ago.

Con Coughlin writing for the *Telegraph* this week reports Lord Carrington as saying the war was caused by a "failure of intelligence equal to that leading up to the invasion of Iraq." Lord Carrington resigned as Foreign Secretary for his role in allowing the Falklands to be invaded.

As the crisis over the Falklands developed. Lord Carrington, who as Foreign Secretary had overall responsibility for Britain's Secret Intelligence Service, was told by intelligence chiefs that General Galtieri, the Argentine dictator, had no immediate plans to invade."On the Falklands the intelligence was that Galtieri would not take any action to get the Falklands until he had exhausted all the other options at the UN. The truth of the matter is that the intelligence proved to be wrong," said Lord Carrington.

"One should never base one's policy solely on intelligence. Mr Blair made the same mistake on the intelligence available on Iraq." Speaking on the eve of the 25th anniversary of the conflict, he said he had no regrets about resigning. "What I regret is that the invasion happened in the first place." he said."And while British intelligence should share some of the blame. Lord Carrington said the real villain of the Falklands was General Galtieri.

"He was like Robert Mugabe in Zimbabwe," said Lord Carrington.

"He played the race card to get himself out of domestic difficulties, and by invading he gave us no option other than to go to war."

Levels of smoking to be reduced not banned?

FOLLOWING an article published in Penguin News last week about the latest meeting of the group estalished to look at the possible introduction of a smoking ban, Councillor Clausen has clarified that the group wished to look at the objectives behind the proposed ban on smoking in enclosed public places and, after examining all options, decided that the underlying objective should be to improve the health of the nation by reducing levels of smoking

At the group's meeting held on Wednesday, they examined a number of ways that a reduction in smoking could be acheived and decided that no single action would reduce levels of smoking and that a multi-pronged approach was required.

Cllr Clausen said this objective is very different from that behind the original proposal which was to protect the public (workers and clients) from second-hand smoke in enclosed places.

Cllr Clausen said she stood by her original stance of only wishing to address the issue of second hand smoke affecting those in enclosed public places, however she added that she would probably back many of the proposals aimed at reducing levels of smoking, "...as it would be morally wrong to ignore the fact that smoking kills."

Wool market report for week ending March 23,

By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices fell across the across the entire micron spectrum at sales in Australia last week.

As shown in the attached Micron Price Guide, fleece wool lots finer than 24 micron fell in value by between 10 and 17 pence per kilogram clean while broader lots fell in value by between 4 and 7 pence per kilogram clean.

Price falls generally removed between 50% and 100% of last weeks price gains for lots finer than 24 micron; however losses were of considerably greater magnitude for broader fleece wool lots.

Falkland Islands farmers are urged to carefully consider the impact of prevailing market conditions on farm cash flow and overall wool income. Wool prices are stronger than last year for fleece wool lots finer than 25 micron but are considerably weaker for broader lots.

Closing prices for each micron category are shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down almost 7 pence per kilogram clean at 386.5 pence per kilogram clean compared to last weeks closing level of 392.7 pence per kilogram clean. In Australia 85% of the 63,558 bales presented to the trade changed hands.

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




