Should we take self-determination message direct to Argentina?

THE Falklands should be actively taking its message to countries outside the UK. Councillor Richard Davies believes, but do we take it direct to Argentina? He wants to hear Islanders' views.

He was responding to comment carried in last week's *Penguin News* in which the Editor asked if funds spent on the Islands' attendance at the United Nations Decolonisation Committee (C24) would be better spent elsewhere.

Argentina uses the C24 as an opportunity to push its sovereignty claim and the Falklands should be at the meeting to counter that. Clir Davies said. "Primarily it's an opportunity for us to put our case in a forum outside of the UK, to Argentina in particular, because it is widely reported in their press."

He believes this canvassing could go further - "If other countries have a better understanding of our situation, it will make life easier" - but wants the public's view on how far.

On his way back to the Islands from the C24 meeting in New York, Cllr Davies spent a few days in Montevideo, during which he gave a number of press interviews. He also addressed students about the Falkland Islands of today and the arguments for self-determination. This was a chance to, "... test the water," as to the success of such meetings, he said, because much of what he said in Montevideo will likely feed into the Argentine press.

So should we take the message direct to Argentina? Cllr Davies is cautiously willing, but does not support talking to politicians. "If someone was to go to Buenos Aires, it would be very much to talk to journalists and maybe students: it would be to promote Falkland Islanders' right to self-determination, to tell them what the modern Falklands are about. It would not be to negotiate or talk to the government - no way."

He continued, "I think we've got to be very clear between the Argentine government, whose policies we abhor, and the Argentine people - there is possibly some merit in trying to enable them to understand us better."

There are problems with this idea, though. The Argentine press is very pro their own government and there are risks that they would spin the story their own way. Clir Davies admits. "One has got to be a bit savvy about how one says things, and about the way it would be perceived here."

There is also overwhelming public opinion against the Falklands in Argentina. Cllr Davies acknowledges this is "a big obstacle", but adds, "you have to just start chipping away at it." More C24 news on page 2

Mud, mud, glorious mud, at the Royal Show

THE term 'bully' has taken on much more serious connotations in recent years.

When I was a kid, the word usually referred to a rather rotund and quite grubby individual who would tease you - always inarticulately for having the wrong hairstyle, school bag, whatever. They were never the sharpest tool in the box and were normally bigger than everyone else, not because they were a super strong freak of nature but because they had been held back for so long they were a good few years older than the rest of the class.

Back then, bullies were pretty much something to be laughed at and even pitied.

Nowadays, however, bullying is no longer considered a joke and the term carries no hint of affection or comedy at all. Instead, we far too regularly hear tragic stories of children spending years being tomented and even being driven to suicide. Likewise adult bullying, the existence and consequences of which have only really begun to be appreciated in recent years. Just because it involves grown ups, doesn't make it any less traumatic.

Therefore I'm glad the accusations within the police force - the truth behind which we admittedly don't yet know - are being taken seriously. The public needs to have absolute confidence in the integrity of officers.

While mulling the issue over this week, it occurred to me that the reporting of the bullying accusations in the police force may have been not exactly one-sided, but a little one-eyed. Just because the police-related investigation is the only one we've heard about, surely that doesn't mean bullying never goes on elsewhere in government?

So I started asking around. A few people cited rumours of allegations within a couple of departments and I duly contacted the Director of Human Resources for details. I didn't want names - there are issues of privacy at play here - but I was interested in knowing how common accusations of bullying are within government departments.

However, I was headed off at the pass. Citing confidentiality, the Chief Executive assured me that any such complaints are fully investigated, "...with a view to seeking a solution if indeed a solution is demanded."

When I suggested that the police are surely not the only department affected by bullying, Mr Simpkins was to the point. He told me there is a need to make a clear distinction between bullying and "firm management" which can be "entirely justified". He added, "There have been no claims of bullying that have been upheld."

OK, none have been upheld, but I still believe it is of interest to the public how many and what accusations have been made within other departments. It would, at the very least, help to place the police force's situation into context.

GH: 'no unauthorised entry'

THE Liberation Day 'indiscretion' reported last week, involving the Aide-de Camp to the Commander of British Forces and the Equerry to HRH Prince Edward, has led to tighter admission procedures at Government House.

Security is always increased at Government House during Royal visits, including a 24 hour police presence.

It is understood that the Aidede-Camp was admitted to Government House, after HRH's Equerry made it clear to the police that he was her personal guest. Because of the lateness of the hour, no one else was consulted.

It is understood that the Governor has since advised that, in future such circumstances, no one should be admitted to Government House without authorisation. Brief telecoms report out now

A SUMMARISED version of telecommunications consultant Dr Chris Doyle's February 2007 report has finally been released by Executive Council (ExCo).

Dr Chris Doyle had been requested by the government to consider and advise on a number of matters including Cable and Wireless's business operations, broadband charges, replacement of the camp system, and broadcasting.

The original version of the report was presented to ExCo in February; they decided that it should not be provided to Cable and Wireless until the company supplied Dr Doyle and the government with the required financial information.

Dr Doyle has now signed a non-disclosure agreement with Cable and Wireless and has been working with the company on the provision of further financial information. COUNCILLOR Ian Hansen did not expect to travel 8,000 miles to get bogged in a car park in Warwickshire and have to be pulled out by tractor, but that is exactly what happened to the Falklands team and hundreds of other people at the Royal Show in Stoneleigh this year.

Scheduled to run from July 1-4, the Show closed a day early as the car parks and walkways beeane dangerous and unusable due to the heavy and constant rain.

However, the Falklands Stand - manned by Clir Hansen, Henry Boughton and the Falkland Islands Government's Representative in the UK, Sukey Cameron, was as popular as ever and the bad weather didn't seem to put visitors off.

Sukey said many old friendships were renewed and new ones made. "A large number of people commented on the various programmes that had been broadcast over the last few months in the UK; they had given them an extremely favourable impression of the Islands," she added.

The new panels of photographs and information gave visitors a general insight into the Islands and DVDs were shown on a plasma screen. Along with brochures and leaflets, the new FIG DVD was given away for people to take home and learn even more about the Islands. Kiddres' packs, created by Mel Rawlinson

at FIGO last year, again proved very popular among the younger callers.

Visitors to the Stand included HRH the Countess of Wessex, who had recently announced that she and HRH the Earl of Wessex will be expecting their second child in December and the Leader of the Liberal Democrats, Sir Menzies Campbell MP.

The Governor's wife and daughter dropped in, as did Amanda and Julian Morris, former General Manager of FIDC and former vet, Steve Whitley, who, once again, had received awards at the Show for his Angora goats.

Sukey reported that interviews were given to a number of the media at the Show and interest in the Islands was "high".

Falklands fights 'no self-determination' clause

"NONSENSE - but potentially dangerous nonsense" is how Councillor Davies has described a move by Spain and Argentina to have the Falklands and Gibraltar "excluded" from the self determination process. At the UN's Committee on

At the UN's Committee on Decolonisation (C24) meeting held last month and attended by Cllr Davies and Cllr Hansen, a clause was passed which would have the United Nations General Assembly exclude the Falklands and Gibraltar from the full exercise of self-determination because they are caught in a sovereignty dispute.

The Falklands has already begun fighting the move, Cllr Davies reported, "...primarily by pointing out very strongly in statements in the meetings in New York and Grenada how inconsistent it is and by lobbying at those meetings we told everyone we met."

Councillors have met with the Governor and shared their concerns. "If it's going to be stopped, we'll need the UK's support." Cllr Davies commented.

The wording for the clause was introduced in 2004 at a seminar the Falklands were not represented at in Papua New Guinea. There is a fairly deep split in the committee because of it, Cllr Davies said.

While describing the move as "nonsense", he added, "It's not something we should just shrug our shoulders about. It is clearly incompatible with the charter of the UN and we should use it to our advantage and make a lot of noise about it."

Work continues on house for veterans

PLANS for a house to be built for 1982 veterans are steadily progressing.

The Falklands Veterans Foundation (FVF) made an application for the construction of a house in Stanley some time ago and has now joined forces with SAMA on the project. They are currently in discussion about how to raise the funds needed for the construction of the house and how it will be looked after.

"Land has been allocated and remains available and we await to hear from them what their plans are," Cllr Summers explained.

Mr Summers said that if there is a house that can cater for several veterans at a time, they may be more inclined to stay for a longer period, "...something that the local SAMA organisation is not in a position to do."

The recent allocation of lottery funding for SAMA means that the November pilgrimage by more than 200 veterans is now. "...pretty much secure" Cllr Summers said.

By Patrick Watts MIDWAY through the twelfth Island Games in the Greek island of Rhodes, the Falklands have performed well in several events.

Clay target shooters Steve Dent and Saul Pitaluga finished in a totally unexpected fourth place in the team sporting event with a score of 74, narrowly missing a bronze medal, but ensuring a Gold Certificate for the Falklands. Both shooters scored 37.

Matthew Vincent's score was dropped off, as the best two scores of the three shooters are counted, but he too will be awarded a certificate

Certificates are awarded for competition between the six smallest islands of the IGA, namely the Norwegian Islands of Froya and Hitra, Alderney, Sark, St Helena and the Falklands. Jersey took the gold with a combined score of 87.

With temperatures touching 50 degrees centigrade up in thehills, the Falklands shooters have found the going tough. Regularly failing trap systems which has turned a normal 20 minute shoot into a two hour nightmare in the searing heat has not helped either. One Western Isles shooter collapsed on the stand suffering from sunstroke.

Later, Lee Clement and Gareth (Joe) Joseph picked up a silver certificate in the Automatic Ball Trap pairs with a combined score of 134. Lee knocked down 61 'pigeons' and Gareth 73

Newcomers to the Islands Games, Menorca, won the gold. The tiny island of Sark amazingly won the bronze medal and the gold certificate

In the swimming pool Thomas Burston broke Alistair Ceballos' long running previous best Falklands time (33.63) in the 50m butterfly event with a time of 31.97 secs. Thomas also established a personal best (PB) and broke his own Falklands record in the 200m freestyle taking 11 seconds off his PB.

In the 100m freestyle Thomas and Drew both lowered their PBs by two seconds.

Falklands golfers encountered blistered feet, sunburn and dusty fairways on the links course at Afandou. After three rounds the Falklands were in 15th place on 843, ahead of the Faroes and Saaremaa and just behind St Helena (821).

Kevin Clapp had the best Falklands score after three rounds with 263. Rounds of 84, 90 and 89 had Kevin in 47th place from a field of 68 competitors.

Troyd Bowles had rounds of 98, 87 and 89 for an aggregate of 274 and 51st position. Rod Tuckwood scored 105, 102 and 99 to make a total of 306, while Steve Vincent recovered from a torrid first round of 121 with scores of 103 and 111 for 335

The Bermudian golfer William Haddrell led the way into the final round with a score of 218 (73, 70, 75).

These games will be remembered for the lack of preparation by the Rhodes organisers. Lack of adequate signs led to a Gibraltarian shooter being lost in the hills with no water.

Cyclists took the wrong turning and ended up miles off the route, causing the race to be re-run. Tennis courts cracked and broke up after two days' play and clay target shooting traps continually broke down.

In another incident, a Menorcan cyclist disqualified in the mountain cycle race for cheating, responded by throwing his cycle at a team official inflicting wounds to his head, bringing a not so friendly aspect from the Games newcomers, to the generally 'ultra-friendly' games.

The Falklands have also been represented at a UK militry shooting competition. A team from the Falkland Islands Defence Force are reported to be doing reasonably well in very wet weather at the Army Rifle Association combat shooting competition. Several members have recorded scores that put them in with the top 100 army best shots.

Falklands win gold and silver certificates | Deal with bullying allegations quickly

COUNCILLORS are, "concerned and anxious," about the recent allegations of bullying within the police force.

They discussed the issue during their monthly meeting of General Purposes Committee.

"It is important that the police get themselves sorted out and working back within the community," Councillor Mike Summers told Penguin News.

"If the allegations are correct then they need to be dealt with quickly because it potentially affects recruitment and the ability to retain a police force." He added, "... it's also upset-

ting for the community if they do not have a police force they are confident in.

Cllr Summers is of the view that the Falklands should be policing from within, "...by our own people who should feel relaxed and confident that people are dealing with it

These kinds of allegations do not help, he said, and will be dealt with, "... in the shortest time possible.

Despite what some may think, Cllr Summers does not believe the allegations reflect unrest in the police force. "Everyone is not at everyone else's throat, that is not the issue here; there seems to be a particular problem with the behaviour of one individual and that has to be sorted out."

If there have been several allegations against one person would it not be simpler to remove them from the situation? Cllr Summers disagrees: "You have to be very clear nowadays about procedure and right and wrong; there were days gone by when you could get sacked on the say so of somebody when you were perfectly innocent and we hope those things don't happen these days.

Cargo prioritised on delayed Elisabeth Boye

CARGO has had to be prioritised on the first sailing of the Elisabeth Boye following delays due to engineering problems.

A spokesperson for shipping agency SAAS (South American Atlantic Shipping) said that the ship has recently completed gearbox repairs in Montevideo and is now loading in Punta Arenas.

Responding to an enquiry that cargo is being left off the delayed Elisabeth Boye in order that empty reefer containers can be shipped to the Islands, the spokesperson said that this is the first sailing

from Punta Arenas for approximately four to five weeks. "There is a considerable amount of space booked and we cannot bring all the cargo on the first sailing."

Cargo has had to be prioritised and the shipping service says that some clients will be inconvenienced, however, the ship is scheduled to return to Punta Arenas within ten days of off-loading cargo in Stanley.

"We appreciate our clients' continued support," said the spokesperson.

Falklands join the International Cricket Council

THE Falklands' application to join the International Cricket Council (ICC) has been successful.

The Falkland Islands Cricket Association (FICA) was made an Affiliate Member of the ICC at its meeting held at Lords this week.

This means that the Falklands can now participate in regional competitions and can bid for development funding from the ICC for annual training schemes for umpires and coaches.

Chairman of FICA, Dr Roger Diggle, said this is an, "exciting development" for the organisation and one they have been working towards for the last seven years.

The association is embarking on a match tour of the UK on July 10 and they are planning a repeat of the successful Under 17s tour to Chile for next April.

A list of the UK fixtures is available from the association. Dr Diggle commented, "Any Falkland Islanders in the vicinity are very welcome to come and watch and support your national team."

Drink driving results in three year ban

STANLEY man Paul McKay (45) was banned from driving for three years after he pleaded guilty on Friday to driving while under the influence of alcohol.

Prosecutor, Ros Cheek told the panel of Justices of the Peace that Mr McKay had been arrested on June 25, after police received a call from a member of the public reporting that he appeared to be in charge of a vehicle while in an intoxicated state.

Mr McKay was found by the police and followed. Ms Cheek said that his driving was reported to be "generally steady" however a roadside breath test proved positive and subsequent Camic breathalyser tests showed a lower reading of 98mg of alcohol per 100ml of breath (the legal limit is 35mg). JP Terry Spruce told Mr

JP Terry Spruce told Mr McKay it was a serious offence through which he put other motorists and pedestrians at risk. "We have got to stamp out drinking and driving," he said. Mr McKay was fined £850 for

Mr McKay was fined £850 for the offence, was ordered to pay £70 costs and had his licence endorsed, in addition to the three year disqualification from driving.

Speeding cases

Raymond Poole pleaded not guilty to a charge of speeding on the Stanley to Darwin road on June 9. Mr Poole's case was adjourned until July 11. Tim Miller pleaded guilty by post to driving seventeen miles over the speed limit on June 9.

In his letter. Mr Miller said he was speeding as he drove home from MPA because he was angry at the special treatment an Argentine man had been given at the airport. He said "I going over it in my mind" and this distracted him from watching his speed.

Mr Miller was fined £235 and will pay £70 prosecution costs: his license was endorsed.

Fishing appeal

IN THE Supreme Court this week the new Chief Justice, the Honourable Mr Justice Gardner QC, heard an appeal made by South Atlantic Marine Services Ltd (SAMS) against a decision of the Fisheries Disputes Commission made on April 4, 2007.

The Commission had held that it had no jurisdiction to deal with an application for review that SAMS, a Falklands-registered fishing company, had made to the Commission in connection with the amount of quota that had been provisionally granted to it earlier this year. Quota is awarded on the basis of companies' catch histories during the period 2000 to 2002.

The Chief Justice's ruling is not expected until August.

Chamber welcomes land sale move

THE Chamber of Commerce has cautiously welcomed a decision by Executive Council (ExCo) to release government land for freehold sale to businesses on a "case by case" basis.

The decision came after Executive Council considered a paper by the General Manager of the Development Corporation, Mr Mark Brunet, which addressed the question, "How can the Falkland Islands Government most effectively dispose of land for commercial use to facilitate economic development?"

Commercial land was formerly only sold on a leasehold basis. Chamber of Commerce President, Roger Spink, said the organisation welcomed the decision to allow in principal businesses to apply for freehold purchase of land, and for each case to be considered by ExCo on its merits.

He said the Chamber would prefer to have published criteria and a "firm policy" on when freehold purchase is possible. "...rather than the uncertainty of the arrangement indicated by government."...

It is however, he said, a step in the right direction and we hope further progress can be made in the future."

Speaking on Falklands Radio this week, Cllr Clausen explained ExCo's thinking behind the decision to adopt the 'case by case' approach.

"There are things out there that we don't wish to see happen, for example, land banking. Land banking is not good for development or for other people who wish to develop; it is not good for land value.

"There are examples of the inability of individual companies to own land freehold, stifling development or the ability of them to secure finance in order to develop, and we have to respond to that."

Executive Council did not agree the thrust of Mr Brunet's paper but a recommendation from him that an asset audit be carried out as a priority was approved. An asset register is also to be established, subject to funding.

Furthermore, ExCo requested that all leasehold agreements be assessed and amended where necessary so that terms are "fair and consistent" for leasees.

Land issues on the agenda

A number of other land use

matters were also considered by ExCo.

A proposed amendment to Section 48 of the Planning Ordinance 1991, allowing for three months rather than two months in which to determine a planning application, was refused. Cllr Clausen reported that she and her colleagues were content that the current time frame and provisions allow for an application to be deferred if required, "...and do not wish to see development stalled unnecessarily."

A timetable of up to one year was approved to carry out a review of the Stanley Town Plan. Issues to be considered will include the recently adopted housing policy, the town centre, the dockyard development and relocation of PWD, business and industrial areas and development of land to the north of Ross Road.

This review does not preclude early consideration on the provision of land for housing.

Cllr Clausen and her colleagues agreed to add applications for buildings listed for "special architectural or historic interest" to the current list of circumstances under which the Environmental Planning Officer should refer to the Planning and Building Committee rather than consider by way of delegated powers.

"Furthermore Council agreed that the current list of delegated powers should be reviewed upon the completion of the review of the Stanley Town Plan."

Non-resident land ownership

At their meeting last week, ExCo also discussed the Land (non-residents) Ordinance 1999 which was passed to enable the government to prevent ownership of Falkland Island land from passing to non-residents.

More recently this Ordinance has been used for the purchase of land and/or property by an individual/body corporate that does not hold either a Permanent Resident Permit or Falkland Island Status regardless of whether they are resident or not.

ExCo agreed that the ordinance should be amended in order that the power to grant licences, "subject to such conditions as may be thought appropriate in the circumstances of each particular case," is as wide as possible and that there is power to vary any conditions imposed.

"Such conditions might include a condition to occupy, for example," Cllr Clausen explained.

"Other conditions which are likely to be essential prerequisites would be the requirement for health and criminal checks."

Counsel is to be sought from FCO legal advisors concerning the potential impact upon the immigration status, and right to reside within the Islands, of holders of licences under the Ordinance.

On board conditions under scrutiny Smoking ban gets back on track

THE Falklands is demonstrating its commitment to better conditions on fishing vessels in its waters with the introduction of a working group.

The terms of reference for the Working Group on Humane and Safe Working Conditions on Fishing Vessels has been considered and agreed by Executive Council.

This working group was established following a number of incidents that took place during the fishing season early in 2007 and will be chaired by Cllr Clausen. The group includes a representative of the fishing industry as well as legal and Fisheries Department advice. Executive Council requested that a representative of the jigging industry also be included.

The group will look specifically at human rights abuses and safety, and the application of policies, procedures and legislation required to meet agreed objectives. Holberg incident

A suite of recommendations regarding policies and procedures to be applied to applications for exploratory fishing in inshore waters, which were first considered by both the Fisheries Advisory and the Environmental Committees, have been agreed, following the grounding of the trawler Holberg in Port Purvis last year.

ExCo also requested that a further paper be provided outlining the current legislative framework within which the government is required to operate when a vessel becomes stricken in territorial waters, so that consideration may be given to any amendments or new legislation required to improve our powers to act in such circumstances.

THE ban on smoking in public places is back on track with the working group now having a clear set of directions to work to.

Following a request for further direction for the Working Group on the Possible Prohibition of Smoking in Public Places, Executive Council identified three objectives for the group.

The objectives to be met are: to protect the work force from the potentially harmful effects of being exposed to tobacco smoke in the workplace; to protect non-smokers from the potentially harmful effects of being exposed to tobacco smoke in enclosed public places; and to discourage the population from smoking for general public health reasons.

Cllr Clausen explained that a number of measures have been proposed to meet these objectives

and ExCo have requested that the Working Group deal with each of the measures to a set time scale. The proposed increase in the

age limit for sale, supply or possession of tobacco from 16 to 18 years and the increase in powers available to police and teachers in relation to children's apparent breach of the law relating to to-bacco, July 2007 (Children and Young Persons (Tobacco) Bill 2007 are currently before Legislative Council.

The group are to report back in September on the proposed ban on smoking in the work place, enclosed public places and all government buildings; an increase in tax on tobacco; the provision of free cessation aids; and the introduction of DARE into the Community School.

'Open door' licences extended to five years

A REQUEST to seek approval from the Secretary of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs to amend the Offshore Petroleum (Licensing) Regulations to extend the second exploration. term to five years (from three) was agreed.

This followed requests from a number of Open Door Production licence holders.

Costs of exploration are today significantly higher and rigs and survey vessels much harder to secure. Furthermore, potential farmin companies have indicated that a three year second phase is too short a time to plan drilling programmes especially if there is a need to collect additional 3D seismic data.

The making of a number of orders under the Offshore Minerals Ordinance 1994, subject to consent by the Secretary of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs was also approved.

Current orders in force apply various pieces of UK health and safety legislation which are now out of date in respect of the UK. When in force the proposed orders will enable HSE (Health and Safety Executive) inspectors engaged on behalf of the government to ensure that health and safety standards on any rig deployed within the Falkland Islands' designated area is operated to a recognised standard.

Under the provisions of the Offshore Installations (Safety Case) Order 2007 it will be possible to recover fees, these fees will cover the cost of enforcement and monitoring of health and safety standards

Council also agreed to amend the Mining Ordinance 2005 to enable licences under the Ordinance to extract stone, flint, chalk, gravel, sand or calcified seaweed to be granted to individuals as well as bodies corporate.

£40K approved for abattoir works

MORE money is to be spent on the abattoir.

Executive Council has approved expenditure of up to £40,000 from the capital budget for costed design works to the Sand Bay Meat Processing Plant and the moving of bunds and construction of revised vehicle access.

A small working group established as a result of Budget Select Committee deliberations last month were instructed to assess and prioritise the proposed capital works to the meat processing plant.

This has been done and the work has been separated into a number of packages; the first and that of highest priority is related to issues of compliance and requires the construction of a leanto on the south side of the building and associated layout changes.

All of the works proposed must take place during winter and, if the first package of work is to be carried out in 2007, there is an urgent need to get accurately costed designs.

The movement of bunds will allow for more efficient vehicular access and also make the space for subsequent proposed works on the site.

THOSE earning less than £13,000 who are not eligible for rebates will be most disadvantaged by the recent rent and service charge increases announced in the budget.

A report on the impact of the increases on members of the community, in particular the lower income households, was prepared for Executive Council.

Cllr Clausen revealed that the conclusions of the report note that, ...whilst the budget attempted to balance any positive and negative effects as well as protect the most financially vulnerable," some

No refund for loligo companies after early close

NO refund will be made in respect of the second loligo season of 2006.

The second season normally runs from July 15 to September 30. In 2006 the fishery was closed early on September 5 for conservation reasons.

This represented a significant loss of fishing time and, on the basis of previous practice, may have merited a refund; several companies asked that this be considered.

However, ExCo did not agree. Clir Clausen commented, "...despite the early closure of the season, the fee revenue ratio was

Saddle Computers sets up shop at Fox Bay

THE temporary change of use of the Fox Bay School building has been approved. West Falklands business Saddle Computers is to use the building, subject to a number of conditions.

Dave Dunford of Saddle Computers said the school is to be used as a retail outlet and will be shared with Leslie Woodward who will be selling craft goods.

Mr Dunford said it is possible

Meeting place needed for youngsters Special parade at RAF Waddington

A PAIR of school girls have asked to meet with councillors to discuss the need for facilities for young people.

Following the demise of The Place - a drop in centre for teenagers - Lesley Stewart and Melissa Barnes wrote to councillors, who discussed the letter at their meeting of General Purposes Committee (GPC) last week.

Cllr Summers said he did not think there was a permanent solution to the lack of a venue for young people to meet up. "Different people have different ideas about how things should be done." However, he said that this request was "interesting" in so much as accommodation was asked for where there would, "...clearly have to be adult supervision."

This is not guaranteed to work though. Cllr Summers cited the example of St Mary's Hall: teenagers were able to use it as a meeting place, under the supervision of a young Catholic priest. This worked for a while, then people stopped going because they did not like being supervised, he explained.

The Place was opened on the basis that the teenagers were old enough and responsible enough to do without supervision, however the behaviour of a few meant the facility had to be closed.

While, "not wishing to be cynical" about the latest suggestion that adult supervision was the answer. Cllr Summers said the whims of teenagers can change, "...so it is a constantly occurring issue.

"We have to remain alert to these things but I really don't see a solution to it."

Staying at school after GCSEs

The plight of post GCSE students was further discussed by councillors last week, during the meeting of GPC.

Whether it is useful or not for students to remain in school when they have employment lined up after they have completed their GCSE exams was raised at last week's public meeting.

Following their discussion. Cllr Summers said he and his colleagues are happy to review the situation and the legislation if it is necessary.

When the school year was changed, the extra six weeks after GCSEs became necessary for students to complete the statutory time in education.

"It may be that it is not sufficiently flexible to deal with certain circumstances like the one that has arisen this year where someone has meaningful employment that also involves a pretty structured training programme. Clir Summers commented. "It may well be thought that this pupil may be better off doing that than further work at school."

Cllr Summers hastened to add that this work is not just sitting around playing, "...they are doing things that are instructive and important for them."

Sir Alan takes up post at the Home Office

THE new Prime Minister. Gordon Brown, has taken the unusual step of giving a ministerial post to a military man.

Former head of the navy and Falklands veteran Sir Alan West, has been appointed as Minister for Security at the Home Office.

Sir Ålan was the First Sea Lord, the professional head of the Royal Navy, from 2002 to 2006. In his final year he paid a visit to the Falklands.

He is well remembered as the commander of HMS Ardent, which was sunk on May 21, 1982 during the Falklands War.

Sir Alan was the last to leave the sinking ship and was subsequently awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for his leadership.



Your questions answered

Q WHEN BFBS switches to digital TV (which we believe is relatively soon), will the local community be given the opportunity to buy BFBS digital broadcasts, or will we have no UK TV programmes?

A Councillor Mike Summers provided the following response.

SSVC/BFBS have made it clear that they are happy to continue to provide BFBS programmes to the Stanley area from Sapper Hill. When they make their change over that should mean an improved service for Stanley residents including more channels.

Our uncertainty is with how to deliver BFBS TV to Camp areas since there will be no future need for BFBS to broadcast Island wide (they will take feed to their few sites directly from satellite).

However we have been working on this with SSVC/BFBS and others for some time and are confident there will be a solution - we just cannot tell you at this point what it is.



DARE officer steps down with regret

AFTER reading the *Penguin News* and the FINN news page on Friday June 29, and following a number of calls from concerned parents, carers and ex-DARE students I feel that I must include my side of the story.

I initially identified DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) in October 1997 while at my Crime Reduction Course at Easingwold near York. I was speaking to a Ministry of Defence Police officer who gave me a set of the materials given to students and their carers. I began fact-finding and found that it could be adapted for the Falkland Islands and the then head of the Infant and Junior School Jean Smith and later John Farrow were very interested.

In 1998 I presented a paper to councillors, which outlined DARE and the benefits that it would have for the community and our children. I received the response that it would be fully supported by FIG but it would not receive any funding.

Dot Wilkinson (the School Liaison Officer) and I held a meeting at the Infant and Junior School with several parents and other interested parties, which included Russ Jarvis, Government House First Secretary. We discussed the smoking and drinking issues and what could be done as a community to reduce this. I discussed DARE with them and they all thought it was a great idea and should be implemented as soon as possible with the support of FIG.

I applied for funding again in 2000, for an officer to go for training to the UK and all costs except for travel would be met by DARE (UK). This met with another refusal for funding but the full support of FIG; at this point I had decided that I was just about to give up when I was approached by the Russ Jarvis who told me that after the meeting at the school, he had been able to secure funding for DARE from Good Government Funds. I was then approached by Argos and was told that the Argos Scholarship Fund was able to supply funding for the materials needed for the students in DARE. This funding is still available and without their assistance and the assistance of the Chamber of Commerce the workbooks would not be available to continue DARE. I would like to thank all that have supported DARE for this.

As for the current status of DARE, everyone is aware of what has happened to the Royal Falkland Islands Police with regards to reductions in budget and investigations into the department. This has meant that I have had to take on more than my usual workload, which meant that DARE in 2006 was disjointed and affected the reception it had from the year 6 students at the Junior School.

I feel that DARE needs 100% effort and commitment from the DARE officer, this I am willing to give as I always have. This, however, cannot be done in my current role, with the cuts that the department has suffered. We have days where there is only one officer on until 4:30PM and I may be required to assist the officer on duty. I have also been required to cover leave and sickness, which has included night duties, all of which have had an impact on DARE.

The other concern is that DARE has been seen as a catchall. DARE does deal with and confront a number of issues, however DARE is not the solution to all the problems that the young people of the Falklands will face.

I would love to continue with being a DARE officer however with current staff shortages and increased workload this will not be possible. I have been working at getting the Senior School Program in place for nearly three years and this will be coming to fruition for the next DARE officer. DARE has been my baby and my family has increased by at least 250 in the last five years, and it would have increased by at least another year six class if I had the opportunity and the time. I thoroughly enjoyed my time in the classroom with all the students from preschool to year six, and would like to thank students, parents, carers and staff alike for your efforts in making DARE the success it is.



Football pitch saga continues

STANLEY's footballers have become increasingly frustrated by the lengthy closure of their pitch.

The pitch was closed a year ago for repairs to its surface; the work was scheduled to run through the 2006 winter and the following summer season, however it remains closed and players are getting impatient.

Footballer Marcus Morrison summed up the general feeling among players: while acknowledging the pitch needed to be improved, he was frustrated by the length of time the works have taken. He commented, "It will be coming up to two seasons without a pitch and we were promised it would be shut for one season. I think the planning has been a bit shoddy and not thought out at all."

The lack of a pitch has had a "serious" impact on the 11-a-side season, Marcus added. "I understand that the pitch needed to be done as it was in a sad state but its becoming frustrating and annoying for footballers especially as it is eating into the second season."

The decision to carry out the work on the field was taken after members of the previous football committee approached Glen Williams, the Works Manager of the Public Works Department (PWD). He said the committee had "serious and valid concerns" about the safety of the playing surface of the sports field for both players and the general public. "Particular concern was mentioned as to the numerous 'pot holes' appearing on the football pitch as well as the large stones coming through as a result of little or no pitch maintenance and/or a lack of funding. Moreover, the worn areas of ground at the goal mouths were so eroded that grass was no longer growing, despite valiant efforts by Tim Miller during each winter to re-seed them."

Mr Williams met with the Leisure Centre Manager, Steve Dent, to discuss carrying out some minor repairs but he advised that the Leisure Centre had no funding budgeted for the football pitch and was unlikely to receive any additional funding in the near future.

After some re-calculating (and a very wet year) some funds were located within the Stanley landscaping vote managed by PWD and made available for work to be carried out on the football pitch.

Following a further meeting with Steve Dent and the football committee it was agreed that the sports field should be closed for one season to allow some repairs to be undertaken with the planned work to commence in the spring of 2006.

Problems

However, the project has been dogged by problems and the work has taken longer than planned.

Some delays were experienced in obtaining appropriate soil and as a result of this delay the machinery that PWD earmarked to carry out the work was relocated back to Camp for other previously scheduled work.

By November/December the soil arrived and the works began. Goal areas, pot holes and indentations were dug out and filled with new soil, approximately 25mm -50mm of depth to the pitch area was added with the whole ground area being levelled off as much as possible, and the entire field was raked, rolled, seeded and fertilised. Protective fleece material was also used to assist improvement/regeneration of the worst affected areas.

Tim Miller was contracted to carry out the raking, seeding, fertilizing and overall care of the ground improvements up until the first cut. Unfortunately, the first batch of seed sown did not take and once the new soil had settled some small stones had appeared; consequently, the ground had to be re-raked.

Following this, there was a further delay with the seed being imported. B this time, it was late summer/early autumn.

The problems continued. A helicopter bringing a medical case to hospital in Stanley landed on the goal mouth area and the ambulance was driven onto the same ground, causing extensive damage to the repair works. Furthermore, works being undertaken on the Waste Heat Project also caused some minor damage.

The field was re-seeded again and. Mr Williams this week commented, "I am pleased to say that it appears to be growing quite well considering the time of year.

"As part of the original agreement Tim Miller will again roll, re-seed and fertilise the field until the first cut which should occur in parallel with the start of the football season.

"It may be necessary to carry out another exercise to remove small stones, etc however once this has been done, the maintenance works should be complete."

Criticism levelled at PWD over the project is "unwarranted," Mr Williams said. "I have been advised by many people that the Falklands is a very difficult place to carry out any landscaping successfully without spending extensive amounts of money.

"That said, PWD has carried out the optimum amount of work possible with the minimal funding available."

He is, "surprised and somewhat disappointed" by the criticism the project has attracted, "... especially when one considers that this type of work would normally be subcontracted to a specialist contractor and would not normally fall within PWD's remit."

Mr Williams recognised that the sports field is a public venue but added, "It would be remiss of PWD to allow continued usage when inherent risks had been brought to our attention."

Portsmouth honours HMS Endurance Greater security for Falklands rare plants

IN THE midst of the current debate of vehicle use of the Cape Pembroke, some people may have noticed a new fence line has gone up around one side of Yorke Bay Pond near FIGAS.

Councillor for the Environment, Dr. Richard Davies assured this is not the start of the government being more restrictive about how people use Stanley Common. However, he said, the area around Yorke Bay is home to a number of rare plants and birds, and the site needs to be carefully managed and protected.

In February the Environmental Planning Department proposed a fence and boulder system to prevent vehicles but not people on foot or horses accessing the immediate area of Yorke Bay Pond.

"We ran a seven-week period of public consultation on the draft management plan and after making some adjustments to the management actions to better accommodate the needs and requirements of horse owners, the Environmental Committee endorsed the management plan in April," explained Environmental Officer Helen Otley

The fence line was constructed by Any Job at the end of May, m time for both the arrival of horses to the Cape Pembroke area and the winter season, when vehicles can more easily damage camp

"Stanley Common belongs to everyone and we need to look after it, so that everyone can enjoy it. The important wildlife around Yorke Bay Pond means that vehicles need to be kept away from the area," said Cllr Davies.

The Environmental Planning Department will also continue its education programme about the importance of respectful and responsible use of the Cape Pembroke region.

A technological boost for MPA school kids

IF YOU are looking to lose weight and get fit while breathing in the clear. fresh air of the Falklands then the Stanley Golf Club could be the answer to your prayers.

After a day out on the golf course you can guarantee a good nights sleep and a sense of well being (depending on the sort of round you put in) not to mention the chance of meeting new. likeminded people.

Not a physically demanding sport, golf is played by all ages who enjoy the fresh air and are not adverse to dressing up in cold weather gear and facing into 50 knots of wind on a Sunday morning.

Golf is a sport which has many advantages for a healthy mind and body.

Though most people do not think of it that way, golf is actually a physical exercise. There's a lot of walking in golf; anything between three and eight miles - depending on how wayward your shots are.

The swinging of your clubs uses different muscles, muscles that don't normally see activity in the course of a normal day. Your arm, shoulder, back, and leg muscles all get used quite a bit during a single game of golf.

Golf also helps reduce stress and cholesterol. two things that everyone needs to decrease. A single game of golf can burn up to a thousand calories, which is a great way to stay in shape and burn off excess fat.

A game of golf gets the blood flowing and increases your heart rate, making it a wonderful cardiovascular exercise.

There is a full fixture list for the season, culminating in the very popular Falklands Cup: a two day competition where the qualifying Kelpers XI pit their wits against the Presidents XI to claim the prestigious cup.

The AWEX "East ern Market Indicator" (EMI) fi nished the week down 14 p/kg clean at 392.8 p/kg clean compared to the previ-ous weeks closing level of 406.8 pence per kilogram clean





Brave Islanders receive awards

THE Royal Humane Society (RHS) have awarded farmers Neil Watson (64) and Pat Whitney (61) Parchment Awards, and Town Taxis Chris Hawksworth (31) a Vellum Award for an act of "real courage" last year.

These awards come just below the RHS' two medals and above their certificates of commendation and follow a recommendation by former Falklands' Governor, David Tatham.

On the morning of Febuary 10, 2006, a tourist liner was to land a group by zodiac inflatable boat on the beach at Uranie Bay, East Falklands. This was despite the fact that Neil had passed on information to the ship that he considered the sea conditions unsuitable.

The inflatable with 10 toursits on board was some 20 metres from the shore when it rode the crest of a large curling wave some three to four metres high, turned side on and capsized. Some of the persons on board were thrown out into the near freezing water; others were trapped under the upturned boat. At this point Chris, Neil and Pat, who had been waiting on shore to receive the group, immediately waded into the sea to rescue those visible in the water and get them to shore.

Chris turned his attention to those under the inflatable, and by repeatedly diving under the boat he managed to bring them to the surface. After 20 minutes spent in the freezing water, all of the tourists were rescued and brought to shore. After warm drinks and dry clothes were dished out at Long Island farm house, all were returned safely to Stanley overland and then to their ship.

With a fear of water, this was no easy feat for Pat who said that at one stage he was completely breathless with panic and had to let the waves wash him and the lady he was helping, up the beach.

"I'm honoured to receive the award," he said, adding that he had never considered there would be any such thing.

Neil said he too was very pleased to be given such a prestigous award. "We only did what anyone would do in the situation," he said, adding that he was relieved at the time that everyone was recovered safely. "When it happened I thought we were going to be dragging bodies out."

Friday, July 13, 2007

Both the older men, who have survived a few scrapes together in the past, most notably when assisting British Forces in 1982, were full of praise for Chris who had dived under the zodiac several times.

"You don't think about the danger at the time," said Chris, "...you just do what has to be done, it is only afterwards you consider the fact that people might have died."

A presentation at Government House is planned for September when the awards will be officially presented to the rescuers.

Lack of classroom space causes concern for Education Board

PRESSURE concerning pupil numbers in the Infant and Junior School (IJS) is increasing with classroom space becoming less than satisfactory.

IJS head teacher Nick Barrett put a paper before the Education Board on Tuesday, in which he assured that the school was fully staffed for the next academic year, but stressed that there was considerable pressure being put on the system because of the increase in pupil numbers.

Classes in the primary sector are expected to be kept at 30 or below, when they are then split into two parallel classes. Pre-school, Year 3 and Year 6 are already in this situation with all except one other class nearing the need to be split into two classes. "There are not enough class rooms," said Mr Barrett.

Pre-school classes are particularly crowded and the idea of a cut off point for registration was discussed. Pre-school is not compulsory, however Director of Education, Barbara Booth along with the Board is of the opinion that the foundations of learning laid down in those years are very important; Board member Natalie Smith added that a reduced, good service is better than none at all.

The Education Department is working in conjunction with Stanley's nurseries on this issue.

With three extensions in the last 20 years the school is once again

not big enough for the 243 students currently on the roll which is projected to increase in 2009. Worryingly, these estimations do not include contract workers' children or any new families from inmigration.

The number of children requiring special educational needs (SEN) also puts pressure on the classroom situation. Thirty-eight children are in the IJS at the moment who need varying levels of special needs education and care.

Mr Barrett paid tribute to the Assistant Special Needs teachers (ASNs) who he said are very hard working and useful to the school, however he said there is a need for an additional SEN teacher.

Mr Barrett said the play area

which has been, ".....eaten into with extensions," is also inadequate for the amount of pupils who now have split break times.

A paper is to go to Executive Council outlining issues such as SEN rooms, additional class rooms and the play area. Cllr Stevens added that figures were also required so councillors can, "...sit down and decide what we can afford and what needs to be done."

WHEN it comes to health we all want the best service possible and to feel safe and confident that our doctors know what is best for us.

We want to know that when the worst happens and we are at our most vulnerable, we are certain to receive quick and effective treatment with minimum delay - 1 was unlucky enough to be at the mercy of both the medical and air service's emergency response teams some ten years ago when I lived on West Falkland and as a result of the treatment I received then. I have every confidence in them now.

We need to trust those in charge of the service and make appraisals on our own experiences, not the occasionally distorted stories that circulate like Chinese whispers from rumour control.

However, an idea that has been bandied about of late is that our expectations may have reached levels that are higher than the Falklands service could ever hope to reach.

I think not - we are no longer a backwater community settling for our lot because we are small and can only afford a certain level of treatment.

We do live in an isolated situation, but geographically that is less so now than it has been for many years, with an excellent relationship with hospitals in Chile and improved communications.

The health survey revealed a willingness of people to pay towards medical services to a certain degree, something that has been apparent for many years judging by the high level of fundraising that goes on for the Stephen Jaffray Fund - a charity that assists families financially when a member has to receive treatment overseas. I know this is not towards treatment of any kind, but it shows how aware people are of the difficulties of living in an isolated place as well as their compassion for families who find themselves in the traumatic situation of being overseas with an ill loved one.

Don't allow the idea that our expectations are too high make us settle for anything less than the best.

We settle for lesser services in many areas and make allowances because it is the Falklands and things costs too much, etc but medical services and education are the two areas where there is no room for cutbacks or stinginess and are also the two departments that we are constantly reassured by councillors will not suffer because of reduced revenue.

We witnessed unjustified, penny pinching cuts in higher education by the previous council and have tolerated a less than satisfactory dental service for some years; we don't want to see that sort of thing happen again.

Education and medical services are the flagships of the Falklands; the two things we are always quick to proclaim as second to none anywhere in the world, when describing our lifestyle. Expectations can never be too high in either area.

Cllr Rendell looks at the healthcare survey

"IT looks as if trends here are very similar to other countries, where private medical treatment is available and an increasing percentage of society take that option. The difference here is of course that overseas travel and accommodation is extra.

"Unfortunately it is not clear from the survey just how many individuals opting to self fund treatment overseas undertook trips solely for that purpose or, as is much more likely, they tagged it on to a trip they were already making."

This was Medical Services Portfolio holder, Councillor Mike Rendell's response to the suggestion that the results of the recent Survey of Health Care in the Falkland Islands indicated that there was a growing perception of the emergence of a two-tier system of health care, favouring those wealthy enough to pay for treatment abroad.

To the further suggestion that the worst off financially were having to wait longer for appointments or even do without, ClIr Rendell replied that it was "simply not true" that having to wait for an appointment inferred that one was worse off and denied that anyones financial circumstances would affect the likelihood of them being referred overseas; this, he said, was determined by the doctors solely on medical grounds.

While agreeing that the public's expectations of immediate treatment sometimes exceeded the ability of our small national heath service to supply, Mr Rendell said that he knew that the service provided by the Medical Department was kept under constant review with the aim of providing "the best possible service within the constraints under which it must inevitably operate."

Asked whether he was surprised by the findings of the survey, Mr.Rendell said that he had been more surprised by some of the questions it contained, which he said, were "presumably formulated without knowledge of the improvements already being undertaken." He quoted the example of the dental department, "where three dental surgeries have been completely refurbished, funding has been agreed for two full time dentists and a part time dental therapist and the waiting list is steadily reducing."

Another very recent change cited by the councillor was that of opticians' charges, which, he said, "will amongst other things significantly increase the number of appointments available, reduce the combined cost to the patient of an eye test, frames and lenses and entitle all over seventies to a free annual eye test and spectacles, if needed."

In Mr Rendell's view these major improvements would bring an enhanced service to many in our community and make some of the findings of the survey redundant.

One of the areas in the survey dealt with the possibility of an FIG medical insurance scheme being introduced. Councillor Rendell said that due to the Falklands' location and the average £2,600 cost per overseas treatment, the premiums for such a scheme would be unaffordable.

Furthermore, he did not believe that council could support such a scheme, especially when over sixty per cent of those surveyed rated the general healthcare service provided in the Falkhand Islands and the level of personal attention received at KEMH as 'good to excellent.'

Councillor Rendell was equally dismissive of the idea suggested by some of those surveyed that the Medical Services Levy should be reintroduced, claiming that it was "inherently unfair, because everyone pays including many of those who cannot really afford it."

Mr Rendell concluded, "A fairer way of raising funds to cover overseas health costs might be by raising the rate of income tax. However, in order to raise an additional £600,000 (the current budgeted cost of medical treatment overseas) there would need to be an increase in the income tax rate of about 30%. I am quite sure that this would not be welcomed."

'Be fair in dealing with sex offenders'

THE number of registered sex offenders in the Falklands is as high if not higher than the UK, according to the Senior Medical Officer.

"WE strongly urge the community to think carefully about its responsibilities and to be open and fair in dealing with sex offenders," said Dr Roger Diggle in response to concerns expressed by a *Penguin News* reader at the attendance of a convicted sex offender at a childrens' party.

Dr Diggle is Chairman of the Falkland Islands Multi-Agency Protection Group, (MAPPG), which was set up in 2005 to ensure, "... an effective management programme for sex offenders in the Falkland Islands and to ensure the safety of the general public and children."

Other members of MAPPG include the Chief Police Officer, the Social Work Team Leader, the Principal Crown Counsel and the Community Psychiatric Nurse. The Visiting Forensic Psychiastrist has also been invited to join the group during his visits to the Falklands.

MAPPG meets regularly (normally monthly) to review all the registered sex offenders and any other relevant cases.

There are ten convicted sex offenders in the Falkland Islands, seven of whom are on the Sex Offenders' Register (two convictions pre-date the legislation and one of those previously registered has come off the register having completed his registration period). The Police also have relevant intelligence on a considerable number of other individuals.

Comparisons with UK figures suggest the rate here is at least as high as in the UK and could be considerably higher. Doctor Diggle warns that comparison of statistics should be undertaken cautiously, due to the small size of the population in the Falkland Islands, but states that sex offending is a real problem within the Falklands Islands and as such must be, "actively managed" to minimise the risk of re-offending and to protect potential victims.

In the view of MAPPG, says Dr Diggle, "The ideal method of management is to have an individually tailored voluntary agreement which clearly details what the offender should do (or should not do) in order to reduce the risk of re-offending

"As it is voluntary it does mean that the offender does not have to follow the agreement, but failure to do so would indicate that there was an increased risk of re-offending."

Dr Diggle states that if the behaviour which consisted of a breach of a voluntary agreement was considered serious enough, the Chief Police Officer might apply to the court for a Sexual Offences Prevention Order (SOPO). This would prohibit the offender from doing certain things, which would mean that the offender would be committing a criminal offence if the terms of the order were breached.

"The experience of the two years since the group was formed seems to indicate that the vast majority of registered sex offenders have worked well with MAPPG and have stuck to the guidelines in their voluntary agreements," he said.

According to Dr Diggle, there can never be zero risk, but MAPPG, working with the offenders can reduce or minimise the risk and adjust the voluntary agreement according to the current perceived risk. "After two years of operation, the results of closer collaboration have been positive," he said.

In the UK sex offenders who have been through a sex offender management course have an extremely low re-offence rate whereas those dealt with purely through the prison system have a reoffence rate sunilar to other criminals, about 70%.

Protecting children is not just MAPPG's responsibility, society as a whole and parents and guardians all have a part to play in ensuring the safety of children, said Dr.Diggle, who added that the majority of sexual offences were committed by members of the child's family or close friends so a lot of protection work had to be in the family home.

However, it had been discovered, said the Senior Medical Officer, that if an offender could relate to children normally, in a safe controlled environment, then this did reduce the risks of re-offending.

Dr Diggle made an appeal to the whole community to adopt a positive approach towards offenders, arguing that the evidence was that the risk that an offender poses can be reduced by ensuring that he or she has as normal a life as possible, with a stable relationship and regular employment.

Society, he said, could either help in this respect by being as positive as possible or, "...could hinder the situation by vigilantism, refusing to offer jobs and generally ostracising individuals."

If members of the public do have concerns, it would be best to communicate those rapidly to any member of MAPPG who would then take the necessary actions, said Dr Diggle.

He concluded, "We are aware how difficult and emotive a subject this is but we do strongly urge the community to think carefully about its responsibilities and to be open and fair in dealing with sex offenders. In the long run this will reduce the future risks, however difficult it is to do this in the first instance "

FIG seeks your views on complaints procedures

GOVERNMENT is seeking the views of the public on a proposed complaints procedure for all departments.

Through this, members of the public will be able to make a complaint about government's service and be assured that the matter will be looked at, both by the department concerned and the central administration. They will also be informed about the progress of their complaint, the likely timeframe in which they will receive a response, and the outcome of their complaint.

Some government departments already have facilities through which people can make complaints but there is not one overall system through which individuals may make a complaint about a given service.

Government Policy and Performance Officer Pippa Lang said that a single complaints procedure will be fairer; "Complainants will know how to make a complaint and how it will be dealt with; staff will know exactly how they must deal with complaints and everyone is treated equally."

A complaints system also helps government to improve services.

Under the system all complaints will be reviewed centrally, enabling councillors and managers to identify ways in which services can be improved as a result of the feedback provided by complaints.

If a complaint is upheld at any stage then the complaints procedure aims to put right what has gone wrong and as far as possible to ensure that the complainant is in the same position they would have been in had things not gone wrong. Complainants will have the opportunity to say what they think would be a fair and reasonable outcome.

Any comments on the proposed complaints procedure are welcome and should be submitted to the Chief Executive csimpkins@sec.gov.fk by Friday 24th August 2007.

Comments received will be submitted to ExCo prior to the approval and introduction of the new procedure.

Director reviews progress shown by Farmers' Week DoA Workshops

ON Tuesday, Department of Agriculture (DoA) Director, Phyl Rendell, began her introduction to the Farmers' Week workshops by stressing the importance of the partnership between the DoA and the Rural Business Association (RBA).

As an illustration of the development of this partnership and the direction of DoA's work, Mrs Rendell reviewed previous presentations, beginning in 2004, when Senior Agricultural Advisor Neil Judd's theme was the launch of the Pasture Improvement Programme in its new "farm-driven" format.

Despite some initial uncertainty, Mrs Rendell said that she believed this step of putting farmers in charge of planning and budgeting for the improvements to their farms represented a sea change and was now well received by the fifty or so farms that participate in the scheme each year.

The fourth year of plans had been reviewed recently with some excellent work proposed for next season.

In Mrs Rendell's opinion these plans reflected. "much of the sustainable farming methods and animal selection processes that have been promoted at these meetings." Among the topics raised in the DoA's 2005 presentations were farmers' grazing trials and the marketing of Falkland Islands produce. The DoA Director said that Farmers present that week pressed hard for new wool marketing initiatives to be considered to gain added value.

This challenge was taken up by Julian Morris, General Manager of FIDC at the time and by the following year the Wool Company was established.

Admitting that there still remained a wide range of views about this initiative, Mrs Rendell stated that in her opinion, it was already making a difference for wool producers.

In 2006, said Mrs Rendell, farmers had learned from Barry Armstrong from South Africa about establishing group breeding schemes for both cattle and sheep.

This presentation had inspired a group of farmers to visit Barry's farm to learn more. Their visit was coordinated by Henry Londt, whose workshops on sheep selection had been run earlier that year.

A number of group breeding schemes for sheep have been established, which Mrs Rendell described as, "...remarkable progress in under a year."

DESPITE the achievements of the well managed South Georgia longline fishery, which has succeeded in reducing mortality of seabirds to almost zero, a new diet sampling programme at Bird Island has highlighted the shocking extent of longline hook ingestion by wandering albatrosses.

More than fifty per cent of wanderer chicks surveyed were found to have ingested longline hooks, fed to them by their parents.

Robin Snape, British Antarctic Survey(BAS) Zoological Field Assistant at Bird Island, reports on his worrying find:

"In winter, when the other albatross species have long since left the island, much of my fieldwork focuses on wandering albatrosses. Every fortnight I take diet samples from five different chicks as part of a study focussed on squid, the most important part of the wandering albatross diet."

"After a sample is taken, the chick (which is only handled once) is re-fed and monitored throughout the season. Previous studies indicate that one-off diet sampling in this way has no effect on chick fledging weight or survival, but provides a wealth of information on foraging ecology that would otherwise be impossible to obtain."

"By looking at the squid beaks found in the diet samples we can tell the species, size and the number of squid that are needed for the birds to be successful in raising their chicks."

Mr Snape has discovered that over half of the chicks diet samples contain large hooks from longline fisheries, usually with small pieces of line attached.

These are most likely to have been consumed in discarded bait and offal thrown overboard by longline vessels, which the adult birds routinely follow at sea. The hooks are then brought back and fed to the chick along with the other food.

In 2004 the Commission for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources (CCAMLR) made removal of hooks from offal mandatory and although compliance has taken some time to achieve, discard of hooks is now considered to be rare in CCAMLR waters.

On the basis of his findings, Mr Snape concludes that the practice of irresponsibly discarding hooks in used bait may be typical of poorly governed fisheries elsewhere and continues:-

"It is also likely that the vessels responsible are not employing other simple, cheap, and effective methods that help protect seabirds."

"In South Georgia's regulated fishery the effectiveness of simple practices such as greater line weighting, only setting lines at night and the use of a streamer or 'tori' line that discourages scavenging birds from coming close to the longlines during setting, has been clearly demonstrated."

"Sadly, wandering albatrosses forage far outside of the South Georgia area and come into conflict with bad fishing practices that are responsible for the continuing decline in the South Georgia population, and the decline of seabird populations worldwide.

"The Bird Island population has almost halved since the early 1970s when longline fishing really began to operate at large-scale in the Southern Ocean and recently the rate of decline has accelerated.

"At the end of each season, shortly before the wanderer chicks fledge, they regurgitate pellets of squid beaks and other indigestible parts of the diet; amongst these we frequently find hooks and line."

Mr Snape said every season the number of these fishing items found in the pellets is recorded. Towards the turn of the century the number of hooks found per season peaked but fell thereafter until last season (2006) when, disappointingly, the number rose again to very high levels. "This season looks to be equally as bad, if not worse," he added.

"As well as all the hooks in the chick diet samples, this year we have found two adult birds, one of which had a hook exiting through its eye socket and the other had a hook piercing its tongue and exiting through the throat," Mr Snape said.

"These injuries could easily have been fatal but the hooks were removed successfully. Clearly many birds must die from their injuries at sea and so will never be accounted for other than in the declining population level," he concluded. Penguin News, July 13, 2007

June: less sunshine but warmer than average

By the MPA Met Office A MONTH of above average temperatures with less sunshine and rainfall than average. The amount of snow was average and there were

no gales. Temperature: The mean maximum temperature for June was 4.8C. Above the long term average of 4.4 C. The highest temperature recorded was 7.7 C. on the 4th and the lowest maximum was 0.8 C on the 1st. The mean minimum temperature was 0.8 C above the long term average of 0.4 C. The lowest minimum was -4.2 C on the 13th and the highest minimum of 4.6 C was recorded on the 4th.

Rainfall: was below average for the month, with a total of 36.1 mm against the normal for June of 58.8 mm. The wettest day was the 1st with 6.6 mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 24 days and 1.0mm or more on 14 days.

Snow: There were 13 days when snow or sleet fell and six days when hail was reported. There were no days of thunder and two days with fog were reported.

Sunshine: There was 50.1 hours of sunshine, below the average of 61.0 hours. The highest daily total was 6.1 hours on the 16th. There were five days when no sunshine was recorded.

Wind/Gales: The monthly mean wind speed was 14.0 knots, slightly above average for June. The highest hourly mean speed of 29 knots occurred on both the 20th and 22nd, the highest gust of 49 knots, occurred on the 30th. There were 13 days with gusts over 33 knots, which is average for the month. No gales were recorded.

Ernie Spencer searches for descendants from early settlers

THROUGH the letters column of Penguin News we would like to draw the attention of all readers to the anti-Falkland Islander propaganda campaign that the Argentine Government is blazing across many countries of the world and in meetings of many international organisations and the need to vigorously counter these arguments.

Among the numerous statements they make to reinforce their unfounded claims is the one that the 1833 resident population of Port Louis (considered synonymous to the Falklands population as a whole. excepting British and American sealers present elsewhere in the Islands) was expelled and that subsequently Argentines were not permitted to visit or live in the Falklands.

We know from Thomas Helsby's account of the Rivero murders at Port Louis in 1833 (a partial copy is transcribed in his history website by Chris Harris) the following people were known to be resident there or in the vicinity and all apart from the sailors were still employees of Louis Vernet:

Captain Matthew Brisbane+, Scotsman (employed as Vernet's Superintendent), William Dickson+, Irishman (left in charge of the flag by the British and also Vernet's storekeeper), Don Ventura Pasos+, Antonio Vehingar+, German (known in Buenos Aires as Antony Wagner), Juan Simon+, Frenchman. (Vernet's Capataz of Gauchos and said to have been appointed Buenos. Aires 'Governor' by Pinedo in January 1833) Thomas Helsby (a clerk in

Vernet's employ who came to the Falklands in March 1833) Antonio Rivero#, Jose Maria Lune#, Juan Brasido#, Manuel Gonzales#, (native Indian from Montevideo), Luciano Pelores (Flores?)#, (native Indian from Montevideo), Manuel Godoy#, (native Indian from Montevideo), Felipe Salagar#, (native Indian from Montevideo), Lattore#, (native Indian from Montevideo)

Charles Russler, Santiago Lopez, Pascual Diego, Manuel Coronel, Antonina Roxa, Gregoria Madrid, Carmelita, First child of Carmelita,

Second Child of Carmelita, Faustin Martinez.

Former crew members of the Schooner Unicorn: Captain William Low*, Henry Channen, John Stokes, Daniel MacKay, Patrick Kermin, Samuel Pearce, George Hopkins, Joseph Douglas. Francis Marchedo*, Jose Manuel Prado*, Honest John (a Black Man) former crew member of the US Schooner Transport wrecked earlier in 1833 at Hope Harbour: Antonio Manuel.*

* Absent from Port Louis, sealing at the mouth of Berkeley Sound during the incident.

+ Murdered by Rivero and his

gang. We have included all the names of all the known residents from this account simply because, no matter how unlikely, one of them may have been the partner/husband of Carmelita and therefore possibly significant.

If anyone has any information that they or anyone they know or know of may be descended from any of the above, or any information that shows that any of them resided in the Falklands for any number of years after 1833 then we would be most grateful if this information could be passed to us using the following email kelper99@yahoo.co.uk address:


Obvious sources may be, family papers, church records of births deaths and marriages, farm records, wills and land registry.

It is well known that during his survey of East Falkland in March 1834 Charles Darwin was accompanied by two gauchos, one of them recorded in Darwin's diary as 'St Jago' (presumably Santiago Lopez). There is also some strong evi-

dence that Antonina Roxa and a Manuel Coronel were resident in the Falklands and taking part in local life for some years after 1833.


Praise must go to the organisers for a job well done. The attendance throughout the week's programme must have been a tremendous boost of confidence to those who undertook the task as organisers.



THIS month's meeting of the Planning and Building Committee began with a word of thanks from chair, the Hon Richard Davies, to Building Advisor Alan Dawson, who is to leave shortly for his good works over the past two years with the local building fraternity.

Of twelve applications for planning permission to be considered by members, just one was a case deferred at a previous meeting. This was for the erection of a one-and-a-half-storey house at 1a Ian Campbell Drive for Grant and Stacey Budd but, due to an objection raised by a neighbour, the scheme was then slightly modified to reduce its height and the committee resolved to grant conditional planning permission, New applications

The following proposals received conditional planning permission: the erection of a covered firing point at the Phillips Point Range on Stanley Common for the Falklands Gun Člub; a single-storey dwelling at the rear of 3 Brandon Road for Kevin Jones (this followed the earlier grant of outline consent): Robin Goodwin's proposal to change the use of the ground floor of The Traveller's Rest (formerly known as the Great Britain Hotel) at Plot 51 Mount Pleasant Road to form tea rooms and a retail outlet: the installation of a housed, back-up generator to the rear of the Standard Chartered Bank on Ross Road; extensions to the north and south of the existing dwelling also the erection of a garage at 3 St Mary's Walk for Gus and Andrea Clausen: the erection of a one-and-a-halfstorey dwelling for Jacqueline Allen at 26 Callaghan Road (rear of 56 Davis Street); Steven Poole's proposal to erect two sheds at 8 Anderson Drive; and the erection of a single-storey dwelling at Mullet Creek Farm for Martyn and Andrea Barlow.

Andrew (Drew) Irvine's outline submission for the erection of a house on land west of 17 Goss Road was refused planning per-mission since the proposal was contrary to the policy adopted in the Stanley Town Plan 2004 on Greenspace Provision.

Deferred at the meeting was Chris May's proposal for the erection of dog eages south of Lookout Rocks for kennelling of working sheepdogs for George, Barren and Speedwell Islands and is to be the subject of discussion on siting

There was one application which, as it sought temporary approval for the winning of minerals, required the approval of Executive Council (ExCo) and members were invited to recommend that it be approved subject to conditions which they duly did. This, submitted by Fraser McKay, was for the excavation of 300 tonnes of dead calcified seaweed from the foreshore at Pond Valley on Spring Point Farm on West Falkland over a period of one year for use as an agricultural liming agent at Teal

River Farm.

The committee then reviewed the work of Alan Dawson in his dealings with applications for building permits and noted that two of the three listed were to be approved with additional information awaited for the third.

Appeals

Next, were the four appeals being made to ExCo following decisions to refuse planning permission. In the cases of the first three (crection of an extension to Malvina House Hotel, the erection of a dwelling on land west of the Beaver Hangar, and the change of use from living room to temporary retail outlet for bicycles at 31 Ross Road West) this was to inform the committee of the written statement received from the appellant also any letters received from third parties and to seek members' agreement to the comments made on those documents by the Environmental Planning Officer -EPO - (Andrea Wright). The committee duly noted the appeal evidence received and agreed with the comments in all three cases.

The fourth appeal was in respect of the refusal to grant outline planning permission for the erection of a new cycle shop and repair premises at 31 Ross Road West and was submitted by Robin Goodwin. Here the committee was invited to review the statement on the case prepared by the EPO which they did and agreed its content

Members then looked at the report prepared by the EPO on Infill Plots" following the invitation to the public to submit their comments on the subject. Seven written responses had been received with all voicing their objections to the proposed maximum 20% plot coverage. It was agreed that each application would be looked at on a case-by-case basis but that Plot Guidelines produced in January 2006 should be borne in mind by applicants. At the forthcoming Workshop to be held later this month, further advice is to be given to committee members on the subject.

Lastly, the committee reviewed a report by the EPO on Conservation Area Legislation and were joined by archivist Jane Cameron. This set out the reasons for the proposed designation of a Conservation Area for Stanley and asked members to consider what would be the appropriate boundaries for this. The committee decided to recommend to ExCo the general principle of amending the Planning Ordinance to allow for the designation of such an Area, and agreed the boundaries as shown on the aforementioned Town Plan. Should ExCo agree to this, then decisions will have to be made on the extent of controls to be exercised within the Area.

The next meeting of the committee is scheduled to take place on Thursday, August 2, commencing at 8.30am in the Liberation Room of the Secretariat.

LONG waiting times at the hospital in recent years mean people have opted to pay for dental, eye and medical treatment abroad. But to what extent are people now selffunding their treatment?

A survey commissioned by the Media Trust on the issue was sent to everyone on the electoral roll in May, Of the 1.397 questionnaires sent out 594 were returned, a response rate of 42.5%

People were asked how much they have spent on their health and to what extent, if any, they would be willing to fund the costs of medical treatment abroad, including flights and accommodation. In the areas of dental health and eye care, around 80% had headed abroad for treatment of their own accord. The figure was less for medical treatment - only 16% went without a referral

While many people commented that the government, not the patient, should pay for all overseas treatment. patients clearly do not expect something for nothing. Thirty-six percent said they would contribute no more than £500 to the costs of treatment while 13% said no more than £1,000.

The idea of investing in a private medical insurance scheme administered by the government was popular, with 44% saying they would support this Furthermore, in the section of the survey inviting comments. 10% of people felt that the Medical Services Levy should be reinstated.

The survey also aimed to gauge the public's perception of health care in the Falklands. From the results, people are largely satisfied with the service they receive and many are willing to contribute financially towards it.

Sixty percent of the 594 people who responded to the health care survey commissioned by the Media Trust, said the government should provide a private medical insurance package for everyone who wants to buy into it.

Overall, people seem happy with the general health care service in the Falkland Islands, with 61% rating the service as 'good to excellent'. Not everyone is happy though - 38% rated the service as 'fair to very poor'.

Respondents were asked for comments, including what they would suggest that the government should do in order to improve health care services in the Falklands. Ten percent felt training should be available for doctors and staff, and 8% felt the doctors and top management should be changed more often.

Concerns concentrated on a number of areas including the attitude of doctors towards patients. waiting times and appointment availability, escalating costs to patients. physio and specialist referrals, breast and prostate cancer screening facilities and a lack of preventative dental and health care.

How much are people paying towards their health?

The survey attempted to ascertain how much money people are now

spending on their health and focused spending on their action and rocused on three specific areas: dental treaton three sponsor and overseas medical treatment in the past five years.

Ten percent of the 594 respondents had been overseas for dental ents had been been and a demain treatment. 26% for eye care and 33% for medical treatment.

Long waiting times have led to people heading overseas for dental treatment, the survey ascertained. Respondents were asked if their

overseas dental trips were the result of a referral by the hospital or if they had gone without a referral, whether the government had paid for all of the cost of travel and treatment or if they had paid all or part of the cost, and an estimate of their overseas dental costs during the past five years. Only 19% had gone on a referral. The government paid all the costs of travel and treatment in 16% of cases, while 14% were partly self-funded and 79% were fully self-funded.

The amount of self-funding var ied from the minimum amount of £30 to a maximum of £11,000, with an average spend of £833.

Seventy-two percent of the respondents commented on the difficulty in obtaining an appointment excessive waiting lists or the length of time between check ups. Concern was expressed by a number of respondents from Camp about the discontinuation of the dental service to West Falklands, and requested it be reinstated

The numbers of people opting to pay for treatment abroad may reduce this year as the dental service catches up with its backlog.

At a meeting of the Health Committee last week, the outgoing Director of Health, Nikki Osborne reported that, at the worst point in August 2006, 664 people were waiting for a first check up. At the end of April this year, 243 people were waiting, a reduction of 63%. Waiting times have fallen slightly from an average of ten months to around eight month

In the last twelve months, 666 people were added to the list and 915 people had their treatment completed.

Eye care

Of 156 respondents who had been overseas for eye care treatment during the past five years, 12% had been referred while 80% had gone without a referral. The government paid all the costs of travel and treatment in only 3% of the cases, while 13% were partly self-funded and 82% were fully self-funded. The average amount spent was £530.

Again, difficulty with obtaining an appointment was cited as a reason for heading overseas. Other comments centred on a lack of information about optician visits, excessive waiting lists or the length of time between check ups. Fifteen percent commented on the high price of glasses and the government's 33% mark up. A further 10% complained about the minimal choice of frames

and support for contact lens wear-

Camp residents had their own concerns here too, with some feeling the eye care service to Camp was declining

Again, the situation with eye care may be set to improve with the news last month of the appointment of new opticians.

Medical treatment

One hundred and ninety-six of the respondents had been overseas for medical treatment during the past five years: 76% had gone on a referral, while 16% had gone without a referral. The government paid all of the costs of travel and treatment in 52% of the cases, while 30% were partly self-funded, and 17% were fully self-funded.

The amount of self-funding varied from the minimum amount of £20, to a maximum of £20,000, with an average spend of £2.300 during the five year period.

A total of 37% of the respondents reported that they had spent more than £2,000 on overseas medical treatment during the five year period, totalling approximately £150,000 of estimated self-funding







In the section of the survey on medical treatment, people were also asked whether they had follow-up treatment or advice at KEMH after their overseas treatment.

The fifty-three percent who answered yes, comprised of 63% women and 37% men. In other words, there are two women for every man returning to the KEMH for followup treatment or advice on their return to the Falkland Islands after overseas medical treatment.

Medical insurance

People were asked how much they would be willing to pay on a monthly basis towards a medical insurance scheme, if it were available. The highest support - 32% - was for £10 per month: 24% selected a monthly contribution of £25 and 7% said £50 per month

Thirty-three respondents felt any monthly contributions should be means tested, especially for pensioners and welfare cases


It's not all doom and gloom

While a number of people had complaints about or suggestions for improvements of the health service, there was also praise.

Comments were received about the improving service provided by the hospital and recent improvements in the dental department, how well the medical services cope in an isolated community, appreciation for having the cost of overseas medical care paid for by the government, and specific examples of how well the doctors and nurses have performed their duties.



Environmental Planning Department Falkland Islands Government

Allocating the 2007/08 FIG Environmental Studies Budget Annually, the Falkland Islands Government provides a sum of approximately £60.000 for environmental research, awareness raising, and conservation and management activities.

The Environmental Committee is responsible for allocating the 'Environmental Studies Budget' (ESB) funds to owners and managers of land, non governmental organisations and international scientists that conduct research and conservation activities in the Falkland Islands.

This year will see a more strategic approach to allocation of the ESB, with a formal application and decision making process. There will be two funding rounds, scheduled for September and tentatively, February.

Priority areas

Projects eligible for ESB funding must assist in the management of the biodiversity of the Falkland Islands. Priority will be given to initiatives addressing the key three themes of the draft 'Falkland Islands Biodiversity Strategy', which are environmental research. on-ground action and education.

The Environmental Committee has prioritised the current biodiversity needs of the Falkland Islands and projects that address these are more likely to gain ESB funds.

Application process

There is no formal application form. However, applications must include information on specific areas. Where possible, some level of co-funding or in-kind costs (e.g. labour, equipment) is desirable. ESB funds can also be used as FIG co-funding when applying to funding bodies in the UK and internationally.

Deadline for applications for the first funding round is Friday 31st August 2007. Applicants are encouraged to discuss proposed projects with the EPD Environmental Officer prior to submission and she can also help draft your application.

Wool market report for week ending July 6, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices increased in value at sales in Sydney and Melbourne last week. The only exception to the positive trend was the 26 micron category which lost 2 pence per kilogram clean

Buying demand was reported to be quite widespread during the week with solid demand from Europe and much of Asia.

The AWEX "Eastern Market In-dicator" (EMI) finished the week up approximately 4 p/kg clean at 397.0 p/kg clean compared to the previous weeks closing level of 392.8 pence per kilogram clean.

Currency factors contributed significantly to the rally in wool prices when expressed in terms of p/kg clean.

As shown in the attached micron "Price Guide Table" increases were generally between 1 and 9 pence per kilogram clean.

In Australia 87% of the 71,979 bales presented to the trade changed hands Included in the offering were 7,062 bales of crossbred wool of which 90% were sold

Wool sales resume in Australia during the week commencing 30th August after a three week selling recess. A small offering of approxi-mately 17,000 bales will take place next week in New Zealand.

Exchange rates used to convert wool prices into pence per kg clean basis, Australian \$2.34 per 1£ sterling compared to \$2.37 per 1£ sterling the previous week.

By Patrick Watts GOLD and silver Certificates in clay target shooting and a new national games record in the swimming pool highlighted the Falklands team achievements at the 12th Island Games on the Greek Island of Rhodes

British soldier Gareth Joseph, in recognition of his sterling work with EOD in the Falklands, carried the flag at the opening ceremony and 15 year old Drew Robertson was selected to participate in the traditional 'mixing of the waters' ceremony

Temperatures which ranged from 36-45 degrees centigrade throughout the week, made competition difficult in all outdoor sports A slight sea breeze assisted the golfers at times on the links course, but the clay target shooters, high in the hills, were subjected to torrid conditions as system failures prolonged many shooting events.

In the open air swimming pool Thomas Burston lowered Alistair Ceballos' long-standing record of 33.63 in the 50m Butterfly, set in Gotland in 1999, by almost 2 seconds, as he recorded a time of 31.95. He finished 23rd of the 27 competitors. Thomas failed by just .03 of a second to break Alistair's record of 28.33 in the 50m freestyle

In the 200m freestyle, a relatively new event for Falklands swimmers. Thomas lowered his own personal best (pb) by a massive 10 seconds with a time of 2.17.53. Drew Robertson achieved a pb of 34.10 in the 50m butterfly and got within 1 second of Edward Freer's National record of 38.69 in the 50m Breaststroke, set in the Shetlands in 2005. Drew had a succession of pbs during the week in which he

started in nine events. Steve Dent followed up his gold certificate team sporting shoot (with Saul Pitaluga) with an equally impresive performance in the individual discipline. On the final day of action he scored 54 to finish in 14th place from a field of 34. Steve outscored shooters from Guernsey, Faroes, Isle of Wight, Gibraltar and Rhodes. The Jersey shooter Jonathan de la Haye with a score of 74 took the gold medal, Shetlands Peter Davies the silver and David Le Rendu of Jersey the bronze. In the ABT individual event, Royal Engineer Gareth (Joe) Joseph, who has spent four years in the Falklands clearing mines, hit rounds of 15,16,15,17,21 for a combined score of 84 and 19th place. Lee Clement started poorly but improved steadily with scores of 11,10,15,17,21=74 and 21st position.

Menorcan shooters took gold and silver and Stefan Roberts from the small island of Sark the bronze. Earlier Gareth and Lee had won a Small Islands silver certificate in the

ABT team Event. The Falklands golf team achieved their highest ever plac-ing, finishing 15th of the 17 competing islands. Their combined score of 1129 was however not quite good enough to win a certificate as Alderney in 13th place on 1040 and St Helena with 1082 in 14th, took the gold and silver certificates re-spectively. The gold medal went to Bermuda on 889, Isle of Man with 897 took the silver and Aland the bronze with 910.

The Falklands team enjoyed friendly rivalry with the golfers from Alderney and St Helena in the battle for individual certificates. David Whatmore (21st position) could not be caught as he shot rounds of 81,82,76.80 = 319 to take the gold certificate. 14 year gold certificate. 14 year old Scott Crowie (46th) of St Helena held off James Williamson of Alderney by one stroke after impressive rounds of 81,88,91,89= 349 to take the silver. Kevin Clapp (49th) was the best of the Falklands golfers with rounds of 84,90,89,96 for a total of 359. Kevin tried desperately on the last day to snatch the silver certificate, but a misunderstanding over the position of his ball on the 6th tee unsettled him, although he did recover to record a couple of 'birdies' so avoiding the three figure score. Troyd Bowles 98, 87,89,91= 365 (51st) had mixed fortunes with several 'birdies' in each round. interspersed by a couple of 7's and 8's, His 89 in the third round included one unusual hole when the ball bounced off a tree, hitting him, and saw him being penalised two strokes for his pains. Rod Tuckwood 105,102,99,99 = 405 (59th) and Steve Vincent 121,103,111,107 = 442 (62nd) fin-ished ahead of golfers from Saaremaa and Faroes.

Bermudian William The Haddres with a total of 287 took gold. Mark Bell of the Isle of Wight hit the lowest round of the tourna-ment - 67 (five under par) on the final day to snatch silver with a score of 291 while Nicholas Mansell of Bermuda on 298 won bronze. Kevin Moore, gold medallist two years ago started with a disasterous 86 but finished with an impressive 69 and 6th place on 303.

Laura Robinson of Bermuda retained the gold medal in the Ladies competition, after a play-off, with a score of 308.Eighteen-year old Clay Target shooter Matthew Vincent carried the Falklands flag at the Closing Ceremony which was

in the picturesque Town Hall square. The IGA flag was lowered and handed to former Chairman Dik Ekstrom from Aland. The Finnish island in the Baltic will host the 2009. Games. The Isle of Wight has been awarded the 2011 Games.

Falklands take first steps to recyling waste

SHORTLY after two oclock on Wednesday afternoon, His Excellency the Governor, Mr Alan Huckle, emerged from his office in shirt sleeves to drop an empty bottle into a neat blue machine, which promptly and with very little fuss reduced it to a small amount of 'cullets' or nonsharp particles.

This was the discreet launch of the first of PWD's glass imploders, centre of a low cost project, the brain child of Maintenance Manager George Burroughs, which is designed to save money, protect the environment and produce a usable product from what would otherwise be wasted material

It sounds like magic and possibly is. Imploders reduce glass to usable rubble, occupying some 5% of its original volume by using sound waves in very much the same way that sopranos have been known to shatter glasses with their high notes

The process was developed by a cruise line, after a judge offered to halve a one million dollar fine imposed on one of its ships for dumping waste off the

coast of Florida, if the company agreed to implement a total waste management system.

Imploders are now universally used on large ships, carrying up to 3,000 passengers who each create up to 5lbs of waste glass per day in the form of champagne and wine bottles. This used to present a unique problem, because the bottles could not be incinerated and occupied the same space whether full or empty.

The Falklands have a similar problem. According to a study carried out by George Burroughs, approximately 230 tonnes of glass bottles are thrown out from Stanley's public houses, restaurants and hotels every year - a sufficient quantity to cover Victory Green to a depth of 75mm - of which the vast majority is currently being sent to land fill.

PWD has bought four imploders: three like the one in the photograph and a larger one, which will all be strategically sited in Stanley.

The glass cullets produced can be used as a coarse or fine aggregate, or as a partial cement substitute in a wide range of concrete-based products, thus reducing the need for sand.

Cullets from the imploders will be used first in a heat sink planned for Stanley Dairy

Hill Cove takes on Chinese domination of the sheepskin tanning business

ONE time Gloucestershire farmer and part-time Hill Cove resident, Henry Boughton, is preparing an attack on the Chinese global domination of the sheepskin business, from a shed in Hill Cove.

With the aid of a new tanning formula and expert assistance from Somerset tanning consultants, Andrew and Jane Tinnion, who arrive in the Falklands on August 1, Henry is confident that next month he will be able to produce three hundred locally grown and locally tanned sheepskins for the Pink Shop in Stanley. In March, he has plans to produce a further four to five hundred with an initial target of one thousand skins for the year

After having imported English sheepskin products into the Falklands for the past six or seven years, Henry is convinced that cruise ship visitors will supply a sufficiently large niche market to make a local tannery viable

Globally, fierce competition in sheepskin production has recently come from the Chinese who, says Henry, appear to be engaged in a deliberate attempt to extinguish all competition by paying well over market price for salted skins from Australia and selling the finished product in huge volumes with very little profit margin.

A new, much less labour intensive formula for the tanning process and the presence of the tourist market in the Falklands give Henry hopes of success.

Henry has deliberately not sought financial backing in the Falklands, but has received a start-up grant from the FCO and is lavish in praise of the support he has received from the people of Hill Cove. He says that he feels he will "have arrived" if his efforts create even one full time job there.

Data collection sheet annoys parents

INFANT and Junior School Head Teacher Nick Barrett, has apologised for a data collection sheet sent home with children to collate their particulars that annoyed parents who were hornfied to discover 'Malvinas' alongside Falkland Islands on the addresses on the form.

Proving that people do not wish to be associated with Argentina in any way, even through a database quirk, parents quickly registered their distaste with the school.

Head Teacher Nick Barrett explained that the data collection sheet sent home from the Infant and Junior School is the standard sheet generated by the SIMS database, a system used by over 20,000 schools in the UK.

"The database provides us not only with contact details but also supports the analysis of data from which we will set targets for children's achievement. We have just installed the database at school and after populating the database we sent the sheet to all parents to confirm that the details we have on file are correct and up-to-date," said Mr Barrett

Unfortunately the database uses the standard internet and United Nations listing for countries and the Falkland Islands is followed by the word 'Malvinas' in brackets.

"Now that this has been drawn to my attention, and bearing in mind the understandable sensitivity of the issue, I have now contacted the software suppliers to see if the database can be amended," the Head teacher explained.

'In hindsight perhaps we could have found a way of obliterating Malvinas, say with a black pen, before sending the sheet home. Certainly there will be no repeat of this unfortunate episode," he assured.

"Finally I would like to make it clear that I take full responsibility for issuing the Data Collection Sheet and I would like to apologise unreservedly for any affront or hurt caused."

THIS week, the hopefully passing cloud that eaused the Editor to have to hurry to Santiago with her husband, brought me the silver lining of once again working for *Penguin News*.

It's been nearly eleven years and a lot has changed about the paper, the premises have heating and a fridge, the dead rat and sewer reek has gone, the printers work and any cutting and pasting is done on the computer.

The biggest changes, however, have been brought about by the arrival of information technology. However much we may moan about the service Cable and Wireless provides - and we do - it now seems incredible to me that as recently as ten years ago, fax machines were still magical and few people on the Falkland Islands had ever sent an email or surfed the web. (If I leave home now without my mobile phone, I have to tend off a panic attack.)

Because the pages of each week's *Penguin News* still get printed, sequentially, throughout the week, there is a window of about half an hour on a Thursday morning for anything like a 'scoop' to find its way into the paper. As a consequence and despite all the technological advances listed above, *Penguin News* still devotes much of its space to validating what people already know, rather than to revelations of the previously unknown. In this sense, it is not so much a newspaper as a mirror which reflects the concerns and activities of this small, but surprisingly vibrant society. This is particularly so in the page for readers' letters.

Reading Jane Cameron's letter in this week's paper provoked the reflection that though a marvelously mongrel bunch from the beginning. Falkland Islanders have always been 'volunteers' rather than 'pressed men' and what nonsense it is therefore for Argentine politicians to attempt to deny our right to self-determination by reference to an "implanted artificial population" when their own sole attempt to implant a population here consisted in setting up a penal colony and ended, predictably, in revolt and murder

Barry Elsby should be congratulated for his long service on the Education Committee and for his championing of the need for excellence. There was a time, which I remember well, when there was unashamed public debate about whether it was worth educating young Falkland Islanders at all, because the lack of opportunities here meant that as soon as they were educated, they would just leave

James Marsh's story and the item about Debbie Summers in this week's paper might seem to prove that point, however I feel that while we are all understandably happy when our students come home, as a society we should congratulate ourselves on producing young professionals with internationally marketable skills and be proud when they go out into the wider world to represent us and to spread the wings which we helped them to grow.

Court news

TWO cases came before magistrates sitting in the Summary Court in Stanley on Wednesday, both ending, after some discussion, with the acceptance of pleas for adjournment.

First before the bench was the case of David Lambert, who is charged with driving a vehicle while over the legally acceptable alcohol limit on March 21.

Mr Lambert, who at the time of his arrest gave a breathalyser reading nearly three times over the legal limit of 35 mg per 100 ml of breath, has yet to submit a plea.

The prosecution requested an adjournment till mid-October, due to what were described as unfortunate circumstances, relating both to the impending absence of the accused from the Falkland Islands, on business and the absence of Mr Lambert's legal representative

The application was supported by Mr David Lang, QC, appearing for the accused, who asked that an existing bail condition requiring Mr Lambert to refrain from driving a motor vehicle, be lifted.

The imposition of such a condition on his client was, in his view, improper, unless it could be shown that not to do so would constitute a danger to the public.

After a short recess, the magistrates: Andrew Brownlee, Leif Pollard and Marlene Short returned to grant an adjournment until 24th October and released Mr Lambert on unconditional bail.

In response to an enquiry from the chairman of the magistrates as to why this case had taken so long to come to court, Crown Counsel, Julia Kraehling-Smith said that due to the likelihood of a plea of innocence on the part of the defendant, a lengthy police investigation had been deemed necessary, requiring forensic evidence to be sent to the UK.

The second case to come before the court concerned Simon Gus Reid and was heard by magistrates Marlene Short and John Fowler, Mrs Pollard and Mr Brownlee having excused themselves.

Mr Reid is charged with carrying away a minor, "unlawfully by force or fraud" on an unspecified date in January.

The court agreed to an appeal for adjournment, due to the absence in the UK of Mr Reid's legal representative, but accepted a request from the prosecution that Mr Reid's bail conditions be extended to include a prohibition from any contact, direct or indirect with a second juvenile, who is a prosecution witness.

An existing condition barring Mr Reid from any contact with the alleged victim of the case was also reimposed.

Low standard living conditions at Fitzroy?

WITH the steady decline of the population of Camp in recent years, the government has reiterated its commitment to encouraging people to live and work in the rural sector. But is this commitment as genuine as the authorities may like us to believe?

Not according to Oscar Velasquez who, after 28 years of employment with first the Falkland Islands Company (FIC) and then statutory corporation Falkland Landholdings (FLH), has moved to Stanley with his family after he resigned from his job at Fitzroy.

Oscar and his wife Arlene had endured some 18 months at the FLH farm in a cold, damp house without heating from midnight to 7am. The electricity was switched off at midnight and with nothing but a Myson-type burner to heat the house a miserable winter was dragging on

The living conditions were affeeting Oscar's health, with his asthma worsening, and carpets and furniture were being ruined by the damp.

Described by a former boss Eric Goss as, "worth his weight in gold," Oscar has a reputation as an excellent stockman and dog handler and has no desire to live anywhere other than in the Camp. "He would work every hour you asked right from when he arrived here from Chile in 1979, already with a farming background," said Eric."

"We had been promised a new roof and dog cages when we moved to Fitzroy from North Arm to be closer to town for the children," Arlene explained

Neither were forthcoming and when they complained about the damp house, the couple were told that it was condensation as a result of Arlene cooking food for her hens - a practice that has been carried out for generations and long before central heating was an option. One more radiator was installed, but it did not function so made no difference.

Penguin News contacted ClIr Richard Stevens in the absence of Councillor Hansen, who is Chairman of the FLH Board. He admitted that promised improvements had not been carried out. "When things didn't happen over some time, it seems that Oscar bottled his frustrations up until something sparked a reaction," said ClIr Stevens.

Oscar decided to hand in his notice in when he felt his shepherding abilities were being questioned.

Clir Stevens agreed that after twenty-eight years of working on farms, FLH could do more, "...but I am told that there may be work available at North Arm and that Oscar and Arlene may go back there when a vacancy occurs." he said.

The question that needs to be answered is why there is a lower standard of accommodation at Fitzroy when other FLH farms offier a high standard. Adequate accommodation is after all a part of the employment package offered by the majority government-owned corporation that should - bearing in mind the level of funding it has received over the years - be a flagship for Falklands sheep farming. Inadequate accommodation provision would seem to be a breach of the corporation's employment agreement.

At the time of going to print the General Manager of FLH felt unable to respond to these enquiries without consulting the Board.

"It does seem strange that Fitzroy doesn't have twenty-four hour power when all the other farms do, plus the fact that a lot of work has gone into improving FLH properties but this one seems to fall short of the required standard," concluded Clir Stevens.

New face at Government House

NEW to Government House is Paul Martinez, who arrived on July 9 to take up the post of First Secretary at Government House. He is dealing exclusively with Falklands issues.

Harriet Hall will continue to be based at Government House, but will work full time for the Government of South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands.

Paul joined the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in 1972. He has served overseas in British Missions in Ireland, France, Jamaica, Peru, Mexico, the Dominican Republic and the United States (in Washington, Chicago and Dallas).

His last appointment in the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in London was as Head of the Southern Cone Section in Latin America and Caribbean Department. He also acted as a rapporteur at the 2006 Antarctic Treaty Consultative Meeting in Edinburgh.

HMS Southampton visits Stanley



HMS Southampton makes an official visit to Stanley this weekend having left Portsmouth on 23 April for her eight month deployment on patrol in the South Atlantic.

En route to the Falklands she passed through the Panama Canal and took part in Teamwork South, a multinational maritime exercise hosted by the Chilean Navy. After several visits to Chile the ship passed through the Patagonian Canals and Straits of Magellan, stopping at Punta Arenas, before arriving off the Falklands at the end of June.

HMS Southampton remains on station in the Falkland Islands until the end of October. She has already visited several settlements and will be calling on several more during her time here.

Concern at wear and tear on roads

THE wear and tear by Public Works Department (PWD) road gangs on the roads they are in essence working to build and maintain was a concern raised by farmers at a meeting with councillors on Friday as the traditional Farmers Week meetings were drawing to a close.

Councillor Mike Rendell responded on the basis that the late finish date on the Mount Alice road on West Falkland was at the crux of the question, saying that getting the plant back to Fox Bay for essential maintenance was a "...pure and simple need."

Farmers stressed that on the whole the private sector were more responsible about the condition and wear and tear on the road network than government employees, while East farmers said there would appear to be more of a problem on the West as on the whole the road gangs on the East are responsible about the movement on heavy plant and machinery when the roads are in a poor condition.

Councillors urged farmers to make their complaints at the time they witnessed the road being subjected to heavy loads when the surface is in poor condition, adding that evidence in the form of digital photographs would also be useful. "If we have some hard evidence we can do something about it," said Clir Richard Stevens, a farmer from the North Camp. It seemed unclear if there was a

It seemed unclear if there was a blanket exemption for government use of the road whereas the private sector have to ring up and request permission to haul with vehicles weighing more than 15 tonne (laden) for a period from the beginning of May to the end of September.

Roads engineer Bob Hancox has confirmed that government vehicles do have to request exemptions to use the road. This is granted by the Chief Executive after receiving advice from the Director of Public Works as to the condition of the roads at the time.

One person commented that there were inadequacies in the way the limit was set, as a single axle 15 tonne vehicle was capable of causing more damage on the roads than a much heavier vehicle with several axles spreading the weight.

Cllrs said they would talk to the relevant departments and try to reach some satisfactory conclusions.

Camp telephone system

The Camp communication system is "diabolical" declared one farmer, who added that the promises made a year ago that the system would be improved have not come to fruition. Cllr Richard Stevens said that

Cllr Richard Stevens said that Cable and Wireless want FIG to make an investment, adding, "...we think they make enough to fund themselves."

He said the issue is currently under discussion and that Telecommunication Consultant Dr Chris Doyle is also looking at different options available that would be suitable for Camp.

Shearing rates

Farmers are generally not opposed to an increase in the rate paid to sheep shearers however there is concern about the overheads farmers pay to the contractor.

"We need a breakdown of what exactly the overheads cover," said one West Falklands farmer who said that it was his understanding that the overheads had initially been to cover air fares which are no longer used, except rarely for the outer islands.

Shearers are currently receiving less to shear sheep in the Falklands than in Australia or New Zealand.

With young local shearers being few and far between, one farmer said that it has to be kept in mind that shearers are always going to have to be imported and as such need an incentive to come here.

The standard of shearing was discussed also with most agreeing that the contractor has to take some responsibility for the standard of shearing and wool preparation.

A working group with representatives from East and West Falklands and Falkland Landholdings is to meet to prepare for negotiations with the shearing contractors.

No known descendants of 1833 group still living in the Falklands

IN response to last week's letter from Ernie Spencer and Lyubomir Ivanov regarding the events of 1833, the Archives have for some time been carrying out research in order to try and establish the facts of what happened.

The 'settlers' Argentina claims were expelled were all members of a military detachment which had been sent to the Islands from Buenos Aires less than four months earlier. Some of them had staged a revolt and murdered their commanding officer. Seven had already been sent back to Buenos Aires for trial and HMS Clio oversaw the departure of the remaining seventeen soldiers and their families. Far from requiring any civilians to leave, Captain Onslow did his best to encourage them to stay and was largely successful. Only four elected to go.

As far as the subsequent history of those civilians listed by Thomas Helsby goes, there were 36 people (including himself) resident at Port Louis in the early months of 1833. Five of these were murdered in August 1833. A further eight were implicated in the murders and were eventually captured, arrested and taken to stand trial. Of the remainder, eleven were sealers from the schooner Unicorn, who presumably left as soon as they found another ship. Helsby himself sailed for Valparaiso on HMS Challenger in January 1834. That only leaves eleven people.

By 1837 it appears that just seven of them remained. Manuel Coronel, Charles Russler the German, the three women, Antonina, Gregoria and Carmelita and Carmelita's two children José and Manuel. There are no records of Charles Russler being married or having children and he does not appear after 1837, so we must assume he left the Islands. Regarding the remaining six people, it must be appreciated that records for these early settlers are sometimes muddled and inconsistent, with details of age, country of origin etc. often varying from one list to another. However the available evidence seems to show the following:

First mentioned by Helsby as being in Port Louis in 1833, Antonina Roxa is probably the person described by Admiral Grey in 1836 as being 'a Montevidean, half Indian and is married to the American sailor 1 in 1838 she was given a divorce from her husband, the first recorded in the Islands. Lt.Lowcay wrote in the Settlement journal on 9th May "In consequence of an application from Mrs. Ant. Kenney to be separated from her husband on various grounds 1 held an open court & from good [illegible] I found it necessary to separate C P Kenney from his wife Antonina" The next day he wrote "Have drawn up a deed of separation between the above parties, but the husband refuses to sign it & not being able to state his reason, I gave him an order not to molest or interfere with his wife on any pretence whatever until the pleasure of the [illegible] is known". Antonina became a naturalised British citizen on 1st January 1841. In the 1842 census she is recorded as having arrived in the Islands in about 1830. She is described in the census as being aged 35, from Buenos Aires, a washerwoman, milkwoman and occasionally gaucho.' She had built up a substantial herd of livestock from her skill at taming cattle. In 1845 she bought land in Stanley. In the 1851 census she is described as a

Sex offenders treated differently?

WHY are there different rules for sex offenders?

seamstress, but later went to work for the Falkland Islands Company cattle farm at Hope Place. By 1862 she was living with her second hus-band. Pedro Varela, *'north of San* Carlos' working cattle. Varela was from Montevideo and had come to the Falklands to work for the Lafone brothers in about 1847. In 1866 Antonina was granted a ten year lease to occupy a station of 6.000 acres of land in the same area (around Smyley's Creek on East Falkland). She was still using the name Roxa for legal transactions and we have no record at present for the date of her second marriage. She died of cancer on 14th February 1869, aged about 65 years old according to the Register. She is not believed to have had any children. Her husband became a naturalised British citizen in 1870 and remarried in 1871, going on to have several children with his second wife. He died in 1884.

Gregoria Madrid-Perry/ Parry

Gregoria Madrid first appears in our records in Helsby's 1833 list. In Governor Moody's census of 1842 she is recorded as being 28 years old. The date of her arrival in the Falklands is given as 1830 and she is described as 'a native of South America". The 1843 census lists her as 'a native of Africa' and in 1846 a note says she is 'a native of the Argentine Republic'. This is typical of the imprecise nature of many of the earlier records. She married Francis Henry Parry, a native of Bermuda, who first appears as a signatory to the Port Louis declaration of 1837. We have no date for their marriage, but it had certainly taken place by the time of Moody's census in January 1842. In 1846 Francis Parry was appointed to Government service as Head Constable with the Police Force. He was one of the longest-serving Government officials of the nineteenth century. still working as Gaoler and Court House Keeper in 1883, two years before his death at the age of 75. Gregoria Parry died of 'Apoplexy' (probably what would now be called a stroke in English) in Stanley on 11th April 1871. Her age was recorded as 55 years and on her death certificate it stated that she was 'a native of Cordova South America'. There is no evidence that Gregoria and Francis had any children.

Carmelita Simon/Coronel/ Penny and family

According to Moody's 1842 census, Carmelita Penny had arrived in the Islands in 1824, making her by far the longest inhabitant. In Helsby's manuscript of 1833 she is recorded as having two children. Her first husband appears to have been Juan Simon, the French capitaz of

the gauchos who was murdered with Brisbane. In 1836 Admiral Grey describes her as a 'negro. the widow of one of the gauchos killed in the dispute. [with] two young children". In Moody's 1842 list she is described as aged 40, married to Richard Penny, an English sailor, who had arrived in the Falklands in 1832. The Port Louis Register records the birth of a son, Richard, to Richard and Carmelita Penny on 22nd July 1837. Moody also wrote in 1842 that Carmelita, in addition to her son Richard, had two sons by former husbands, José Simon aged 11 and Manuel Coronel aged 8. Helsby does not link Carmelita with Simon or particularly with Coronel in his account, although after the murders Carmelita and her two children seem to have stuck with Coronel in the group's attempts to find safety. Coronel Snr. died sometime in 1841. In the 1843 census Carmelita, like Gregoria, is described as being a native of Africa, although the 1842 census said she was from South America.

Carmelita's fate was rather a tragic one. On 6th May 1845 Richard Penny Snr. was drowned in a boating accident. On 12th May Governor Moody sent Carmelita's son (presumably José Simon, the eldest) to Port Louis from Stanley with a spare horse "and wishes her to ride up with him" (that is, to come to Stanley). Richard Penny's body was not recovered until the end of August. A few weeks later, on 27th October, Carmelita herself was found dead on the shore of Stanley Harbour'. On 31st October the Magistrate reported to the Governor that an inquest into her death had concluded that "she drowned herself while labouring under a fit of temporary insanity She was buried at Port Louis with her husband. Her three sons all appear in the 1846 census, José Simon aged 15, Manuel Coronel aged 12 and Richard Penny aged 9. By the time of the 1851 census José was working as a carpenter, Manuel was working as a gaucho and Richard aged 14 was an apprentice. After that time we cannot find further records of any of them.

As neither Antonina nor Gregoria seem to have had children and we can find no further mention of any of Carmelita's sons after the 1851 census, we can only say there are no known descendants of any of the 1833 group in the Islands today. However there is plenty of evidence that those of South American, or Argentine, origin who remained in the Falklands after 1833 continued to lead their lives as full members of the community. Barry reflects on his 14 years with the Education Board

JUST over a week ago 1 resigned from my position as the Community School representative on the Board of Education and attended my last meeting on Tuesday July 10.

I have been an elected member of the Board almost continuously for the last 14 years or so, representing first the Infant and Junior School and then the Community School.

During this time our education system, thanks to generous financial support from Councillors, has come on in leaps and bounds.

I have had the privilege to be involved with planning both extensions to the Junior School and also with the development of Special Education Needs (SEN) provision to help those with learning difficul-

ties. We have moved from a position where our provision was, in all honesty, almost non-existent, to one where we are now able to cater for most problems. Pupils are no longer sent away and those who had been sent have been able to return and continue their education here.

This has only been possible with generous funding from Government and as a community we should be proud of this achievement.

My last years on the Board have been as the representative for the Community School. During this time we have seen a slow improvement in academic achievements, including GCSE grades, but perhaps not as much as one would have hoped for, bearing in mind the tremendous facilities and small class sizes we have.

I fully accept that the more academic pathway of A levels at Peter Symmons and then University is not for everyone and it is pleasing to see the growing number of students attending Chichester College to pursue more vocational courses.

We are fortunate indeed to have a link with such a college and anyone who has visited it or talked to the college tutor when he visited the Islands recently could not fail but be impressed.

When I told people that I was resigning, someone asked me what I thought I had achieved.

Working as a member of the Board we have achieved a lot, but as an individual I feel my real achievement was to force through the awarding of prizes for academic excellence or effort.

Those new to the Islands or those whose children have only just started school may think it obvious that students should receive such awards. Had you been here eight years or so ago you would have found the attitude quite different.

Then there was fierce opposition from some parents and teachers. Their argument was that as not everyone could get a prize, those who didn't get one would feel so upset that it would cause them to do less well at school. Yet these same people were quite happy to see the awarding of prizes for sporting achievement.

The academic prizes now awarded in both schools are sponsored by Islanders or people who have made their home here.

They realise that this world is comnetitive and our students have to reach their true potential if they are to succeed.

That doesn't mean being the best in the class but it does mean trying one's hardest. It means being pre-

Feeble excuses for PWD disaster

I REFER to the article, 'Football pitch saga continues' in Penguin News of July 6.

The explanation by PWD Works Manager Glen Williams that 'the Falklands is a very difficult place to carry out any landscaping' seems a feeble excuse to cover-up for an inadequate knowledge of surface repairs

As far back as 1960 a group of us footballers would head for Stanley Common, every mid-winter, and using peat spades cut three feet long, one foot wide, six inch deep top sods

Pat Whitney would then transport these strong turls to the soccer field in his old truck, and we would spend many hours, without machinery, digging out the affected areas of the pitch, and place the newly cut turfs in the holes. Usually some peat mould was spread to encourage top on growth. By October the pitch would be playable as the turfs took root quickly. I must have spent about 25 years working on the field during the winter months.

When I observed the latest at-tempt by the PWD to repair the field - dig out and fill with soil - 1

Most successful year ever for the Illex fishery

By Dr Sasha Arkhipkin, Senior Fisheries Scientist, IT IS common for squid to live only for one year and to spawn once at the end of their life, meaning that in their sad case the parents never meet their offspring.

Illex squid grow rapidly from 0.0001gms at hatching to 1200-1500gms as an adult in just one year. Every female can lay about half a million eggs. Survival of eggs and larvae depends strongly on oceanographic conditions in their spawning grounds located over the continental slope off Uruguay and southern Brazil – generally, the cooler the waters are, the more larvae survive and migrate southwards to the Patagonian Shelf.


These life style features together with high variability in the marine environment ensure the volatile nature of squid stocks, which are extremely difficult to predict. For example, the offspring of the large squid population may encounter unfavourable environmental conditions during their most vulnerable larval period and vanish in great numbers causing a marked decrease in squid abundance in the following year, and vice versa.

An increased variability in the environment in the Southwest Atlantic in conjunction with the presence of the large fishing fleet taking out adult squid and therefore contributing more to their mortality caused enormous fluctuations (more than hundred times) in the *Illex* abundance during the last 20 years of the Falkland fishery, from the record catch of 266 thousand tonnes in the 'bumper' year 1999 to the miniscule catch of 2 thousand tonnes in the unfortunate year 2004.

This example shows how risky the squid fishing business can be, a fact that also has implications for the Falkland's economy. A significant proportion of revenue is derived from selling *Illex* licences to the fishing companies. This year *Illex* licence fees

This year *lilex* licence fees amounted to some £6.1 million. As such *lilex* is still the most important fishery in terms of licence fee value, although it is significantly less than in some previous years, for example, £16 million in 2001

example, £16 million in 2001 The good Illex fishery in 2006 raised some hopes about the recovery of the Illex stocks, when only 43 licensed jiggers caught an impressive 82 thousand tonnes of squid. More fishing companies were



waters (9°C) in the last week of April 2007

attracted by that potential perspective and 58 jiggers received their licenses to fish in the Falkland Zones in 2007.

The fishing started on a positive note on the High Seas, where several trawlers reported catches between 20 and 40 tonnes of *Illex* in January. Squid were rather small and immature, indicating that they belonged to the South Patagonian Stock (SPS) that usually migrates later to the Falkland waters.

However, oceanographic conditions in the Southwest Atlantic in January-February appeared to be unfavourable for the SPS squid.

A strong negative anomaly of sea surface temperatures $(1-1.5^{\circ}C)$ was observed over the entire Patagonian Shelf, causing a delay in southbound squid migrations. As a result, squid stayed for longer on the High Seas, providing stable catches of 20-25 tonnes per day both for trawlers and jiggers.

The *Illex* fishery in the Falkland Zones started as usual on 15th February with only 1-2 jiggers fishing.

In the last week of February, the number of vessels increased up to 53 jiggers, all of them fishing in the northwest of FICZ in the area of a rather warm (11°C) inflow of shelf waters coming from the west Daily catches were low (9-14 tonnes), decreasing further to 4-5 tonnes per night by the end of the month.

Dense aggregations of *Illex* on the High Seas attracted almost all jiggers to fish there in the first half of March, with only 1-2 vessels checking the north-western part of FOCZ on their way to trans-ship in Berkeley Sound.

This was how the first jigger finally discovered the presence of *Illex* aggregations in Falkland waters taking about 70 tonnes per night on 13th March.

It took about a week for more of the jigging fleet to move to the FICZ/FOCZ from the High Seas, and that was finally rewarded by consistently high catches until the end of the month, averaging 40 tonnes per night for 30-35 working vessels.

Maximum catch of 91 tonnes per night was observed on 26 March. The remainder of the licensed jiggers (~22 vessels) still preferred to lish on the High Seas where the catches might have been presumably even higher than those in the Falklands.

Fortunately for the Falkland fishery, the oceanography in the Southwest Atlantic returned back to normal in April, with only a slight $(0.5^{\circ}C)$ negative anomaly of sea surface temperatures observed in the west of the FICZ.

The presence of relatively warm inflow of shelf waters with water temperatures of ~9°C was especially crucial as it favoured the concentration of *Illex* squid on its borders with the colder waters of the Falkland Current (-7° C). Together with the high abundance of the SPS squid this year it resulted in the outstanding fishery for *Illex*.

ing fisher for *Illex*. The whole fleet of Falkland-licensed jiggers fished in the warm inflow (see Figure) in April and first half of May, having stable catches of about 60 tonnes of squid per night. With the catches like this, it usually took only about a week to fill up a vessel's hold.

Maximum catches achieved 130 tonnes per night. At any one time, only 40-45 vessels were actually fishing, with the rest either transhipping or waiting for transhipment in Berkeley Sound.

The level of transhipment activity in Berkeley Sound was high with both licensed vessels and vessels from the High Seas involved. Transhipping fees amounted to some £569,000 which is more than double that of the previous year

Seasonal cooling of the shelf waters in the second half of May induced the opposite northbound migrations of the SPS squid that fed in Falkland waters in March-April.

Simultaneously, the SPS squid that fed in Argentinean waters of the South Patagonian Shelf started to move through the north-western part of FICZ on their way to the High Seas. A part of the jigging fleet re-located there and had good catches (40-50 tonnes per night). In the last week of May most

In the last week of May most squid moved further north outside the Falkland Zones, and catches declined to 20-25 tonnes per night. A majority of jiggers followed squid aggregations to the High Seas, with only 6 vessels being left in the Falkland fishery.

In June, the warm inflow of shelf waters in the northwest part of the FICZ/FOCZ finally dissipated with surface temperatures being 7- 5° C verywhere to the north of the Falkland Islands

Strong gradients between shelf waters and the Falkland Current were observed only in the northernmost part of the FOCZ between 48 and 49°S, concentrating the last schools of the migrating SPS squid.

After the end of May drop, catches increased again up to 35-45 tonnes per night attracting seven more jiggers to return to the Falkland waters from the High Seas. The whole fleet of 10-14 ves-

The whole fleet of 10-14 vessels had stable mean daily catches of 40-42 tonnes per night until the end of the fishing season that was closed as planned on 15^{th} June

The total Fatkland *Illex* catch for this year achieved 161.5 thousand tonnes, which was the highest annual catch since 2000 However, taking into account the squid abundance, in terms of catch per vessel day the season 2007, in which the 20th anniversary of the Falkland fishery was marked, was the best season ever

There is a certain ambiguity about the recent squid season: on the one hand, it is excellent that the *Illex* stocks recovered after two dramatic years of low abundance in 2004 and 2005, but on the other hand, large quantities of frozen squid from this year's calch have already over-flooded the market, causing some difficulties to fishing companies.

I've always been very aware of how lucky I am in terms of my background. I take great pride in telling people everything I can about the Islands and I do miss them.

I miss the fact that you will invariably see people you know when you're out. I love it that a ten minute walk will often take twenty minutes as you'll usually run into a couple of people you know and have a quick chat with them.

I also miss the large scale dice games which marked the beginning of many good nights out. I find it's too expensive to play drinking games in the pubs over here. As I have been away so long my accent has lightened a lot but I find that within ten minutes of talking to someone from home, or after a lot of drinks it comes back, as does my use of "Che".

There are many aspects of living and working in the UK I enjoy: I like being able to get to football games or go to gigs (much as I loved the Fighting Pigs!). Sometimes,

The early years: 1959 - 1973

AT the end of the 1958 darts season, Governor Arrowsmith very kindly presented a further championship cup for an individual competition on a knockout basis open to everybody in the Falkland Islands, not just to members of the darts league, and so the prestigious Governor's Cup tournament was bom

Unfortunately in 1959 very few entries were received from the camp and a mere 68 players took part in the competition.

Two preliminary rounds were held on the various boards in Stanley, and the final 32 contestants played off in the Gymnasium on July 25, 1959. The original concept of the competition was that only 16 Stanley finalists were envisaged with the other 16 to come from camp, so "... the winner of the Governor's Cup competition will truly be the Champion Darts Player of the Falkland Islands," reported the Monthly Review.

A large crowd gathered to watch the finals "Some very good matches were played and the final was in doubt right to the end as both players were down to a "double" and the crowd on edge until Stan Smith relieved the tension by finding the required mark Jimmy Whitney was runner up.

Entries increased to 70 the following year and included several ladies, but the Campers were out in force: Tooty and Ewan Morrison both from North Arm claimed first and second respectivley

In 1961 there were 106 entries from Stanley and the camp including 13 ladies. "Play started at 7pm ... in the Defence Force Hall and although the four boards erected for the occasion were pounded continuously it was past midnight before the second round was completed. Albert (Pud) Henricksen played two magnificent games and won the cup by virtue of his consistent scoring and his ability to finish.

Entries continued to rise in 1962: (101 entries) with the ladies maintaming their interest and Keith Summers taking the Cup

In 1963 there were 100 entries including nine ladies. "Most of the ladies did not survive the first round but Mrs Keith Summers and Miss Eva Alazia did. Mrs Summers eliminated Gerald Jennings but in the next round had the misfortune to meet her husband ... who defeated his wife in a most unhusbandly manner! Miss Eva together the above information

2007 Governor's Cup draws a large crowd

SEVENTY-TWO men and 40 ladies took part in the Islands' most popular sport in the form of the Governor's Cup darts competion on Saturday.

The new arrangement of eight boards supplied a steady pace of darts throughout a thoroughly entertaining evening.

Players such as Joan Middleton who has been a force to be reckoned with in both major competitions and the league for more than 30 years commented that it was the, ".. best competition I have ever been to."

Praise indeed for the committee that have worked hard to utilise sugAlazia played havoc with the opposition in her passage to the semi-finals

The idea of commentators doing well in the competition is not new as the Monthly Review that year suggested that the way to do well _____ could be to get vourself a commentator's job as Bill [Etheridge] did the commentating, until he had pro-gressed so far that he had to enlist the services of John Pearson. A tip that Toot Ford has evidently

taken to heart.

In 1964, there were 128 entries including 13 ladies and stepped up to 134 in 1965 of which about 10 were ladies. Sydney Smith, aged 18, won the Cup on his first attempt.

In 1966 Patrick Watts took the darts to a new level via the airwayes with an exciting commentary which, ... linked with his enthusiasm and impartiality, brought a lucid picture of the final matches into all houses connected to the Broadcasting Studio, and compensated all who were interested but unable to attend. _In this year's games Mrs Glenda McGill was the last lady to be beaten.

In 1967 one of the highlights was Stan Johnson's scoring 180, but William 'Junibo' Whitney took the Cup.

191 players took part in 1968 when Doug Hansen proved to be champion and the following year Terry Betts won.

Over 300 spectators watched the final games in 1970 with the ladies championship being won by Jenny MacAskill after defeating Lil Hall and Glenda McGill in the finals. Jumbo Whitney was back on form taking the Cup for the second time.

Ladies entries were up to 22 in 1972 with 145 players taking part and Joe King and Patrick Watts recorded commentaries for later broadcast. Highest finishing lady was Viv Perkins and Pat Lee took the Cup.

In 1973 the Governor's Cup was contested for in the Town Hall and the minimum age was lowered to 15. This allowed Julie Clarke, aged 15, to win the ladies prize for progressing furthermost through the tournament and Les Biggs took the Cup.

As far as records reveal, the age reverted to 18 in 1974 and has continued in that format to the present day. •Thanks to Natalie Smith for taking the time to go through past records and Monthly Reviews to put

Governor's Cup facts and figures

The first cup was presented by Governor Arrowsmith in 1958. Governor Rex Hunt provided a new cup, first presented to the 1981 winner. A competition was held between all previous winners of the original cup who were still in the Falklands - the winner, Stewart Morrison, got to keep the Cup. In 2006 Governor Pearce presented another new cup. •Youngest winners: Sydney Smith, Terry Betts and Maurice Blackley were

all aged 18 when they won (not sure who was actually the youngest) Oldest winner: Charles Clifton who was aged 67 when he won in 1980.

"Two consecutive wins: Bill Etheridge (1963 and 1964); Colin Smith (1993 and 1994; 1996 and 1997)

From 1959 to 1981 the throwing distance was 8ft. This was changed to 7'9¼" in 1984.

•No competitions were played in 1982 or 1983.

¹Up to and including 1981, the final was the best of three legs; 1984-1987 best of five legs, 1988 onwards best of seven legs.

•1999 was the first year for separate ladies and gents competitions; prior to that the men played in an "Open" competition along with the ladies. It was also decided to play the tournament on a single night. (NB. The decision to abolish the "Open" had nothing to do with Gary Hewitt saying that he would jump off the Town Hall roof it a woman ever won the Governor's Cup!)

In 2002 the format was changed from 301 double start to 501 straight start (501 format had been tried for one year only in 1991) In 2003 the third and fourth playoff was abolished - since then joint third

prizes have been presented. •The cup has only been won on three occasions by a non-Falkland Islander: 1975 Tom McIntyre (Royal Marine), 1999 Rob Green, 2003 Duncan Whinyates, but is not in any case allowed to be removed from the Falkland Islands.

•Eva Alazia is the only woman to reach the semi finals of the Governor's Cup Open competition.

•In 2003 the venue for the competition was changed to the new FIDF Drill Hall Initially four boards were used then six. In 2007 the number of boards was increased to eigh

Ladies Rose Bowl

•A separate ladies competition with its own trophy began in 1976 when Governor French presented the first ladies rose bowl.

•Margaret Goss has won the competition six times, including three con secutive occasions (1998-2000). Julie Clarke has won three times and Hazel Collins twice

"Governor Lamont presented a new rose bowl in 2001. Margaret Goss was given the previous one to keep following her three consecutive wins. The final in 1981 was between two sisters (Eva Alazia and Joan Middleton) The 1992 final was between mother and daughter (Nora and Jenny Smith)

Activities commenced in Auckland, where Liz followed up a Falklands travel feature appearing in the New Zealand Herald in early June with a presentation to a landbased travel agency

Meetings with several operators in Sydney followed before Liz headed to Hobart for the 18th Annual General Meeting of the International Association of Antarctic Tour Operators (IAATO), the self-regulating body to which nearly all the the expedition ships which visit the Antarctic and the Falklands belong.

Also at the meeting were Richard McKee of the South Georgia Government and - for the seventh year running - Debbie Summers of Sulivan Shipping Services.

More vessels and passengers visited the Antarctic region during the past season than ever since IAATO's inception in 1991

Liz reports that the challenge of conserving the Antarctic environment and maintaining a unique passenger experience in the face of increasing visitor numbers was a major and recurring theme of the meetings.

She continues that the ultimate conclusion of the members was that whilst passenger numbers are set to increase, there would be a distinct future shift towards cruises which would not land passengers, thus minimising impact on the fragile environment.

Suggestions that Antarctic passenger numbers should be capped as a way of managing future growth were discussed, but eventually dismissed due to perceived difficulties in calculating permissible levels and identifying a governing body.

At present, both Antarctica and the Falklands are experiencing 15% annual growth in the number of passengers visiting their shores, with no estimates available for when the growth might slow.

Whilst in Hobart Liz met with Dr Claire Ellis from Tourism Tasmania. Like the Falklands, Tasmania is an island destination forced to find creative solutions to problems of access.

Liz was encouraged that Tasmanian operators have overcome many of the problems currently faced by Falklands operators.

In establishing a relationship between the two organisations, Liz expreses the hope that all Falklands operators will benefit - "be it through access to practical case studies or progressive marketing methods designed to capture increasingly well-informed travellers.

After Hobart, Liz travelled to Melbourne and gave presentations to five independent agencies, once again specialising in South American holidays. She reports that as in Sydney and Auckland, each agency was excited at the prospect of offering the Falklands as a new, unspoilt destination for their increasingly selective clients.

The only criticism to raise its head was that of flight access, with unanimous agreement that a second mid-week flight to the Islands from South America would allow much greater flexibility for travellers and potentially result in more visitors.

Agencies told Liz that as Australians and New Zealanders typically holiday for three to five weeks, it could be difficult to sell an entire week in one country with so much on offer in neighbouring South America.

Liz concluded by saying that the presentations helped FITB to achieve its goal of raising awareness of the Falklands in selected target markets and were also "a great way to dispel some of the common myths surrounding the Falklands, particularly in regards to weather and lifestyle."

Each of the meetings have resulted in further activity for FITB, ranging from the provision of images and written content for inclusion in overseas marketing materials, to requests for detailed itineraries for trips as early as November 2007.

FITB will now involve the private sector, who, says Liz, "will play a direct role in converting interest and enquiries to actual visits.'

GCSE students get to work around town

AS part of their post GCSE programme, Year 11 have just spent two weeks in the community gaining experience in a variety of work places.

The jobs applied for this year have been very diverse. As part of my two weeks with *Penguin News* I spoke to a few of the students to find out how they were enjoying their new experiences outside the school environment.

Two students went to Govern-

Even though Nadia has found working at the hospital a great new experience, she said she would prefer to find a career in the design sector, particularly interior design.





PASSENGER CHECK-IN INFORMA-TION Liquid Restrictions The liquid restrictions imposed as of the 23rd November 2006 still apply to ci-vilian aircraft leaving the Falkland Is-lands. Passengers may carry small quantities of liquids in their hand bag-gage provided each container is no larger than 100ml (3.3fl oz). These must be contained in a single, transparent, re-sealable plastic bag, which itself must not exceed 1 litre in capacity (approx 20cm x 20cm). The contents of the bag must fit comfortably and the bag should be sealed. This bag must be presented for examination at the airport security screening point. Liquids larger than 100ml must be packed in the hold lug-gage and checked in. Liquids include: All drinks including alcoholic bever-ages, water, soup and syrups. Creams, lotions, oils, perfumes, mascara etc.

Sprays and pressurised containers in-cluding shaving foam and spray deo-dorants.

Pastes including tooth paste. Gels, including hair and shower gel Any other solution and items of similar consistency. For further information on the hand lug-

'FIG have spent £400k on my training, but won't employ me

ISLANDER Diana Miller (nee Roberts) has spent almost a decade studying and training to be a veterinary surgeon at the expense of the government and now wants to come home, but there is no job available for her.

"Over the past nine and a half years the Department of Agriculture (DoA) has spent approximately £400,000 training me, a permanent DOA staff member, to become a veterinary surgeon," explained Diana.

In the four and a half years since she graduated, the DOA has not been able to provide any plan for her to return to undertake the duties for which she has trained.

As the recipient of this great opportunity and the substantial funding that has accompanied it, the situation is now both, "highly frustrating and embarrassing," she said. Particularly so since she has kept in contact with the DOA, as requested, and notified the appropriate senior DOA staff that were responsible for planning the future staffing requirements of the Veterinary Service that she planned to return.

"In arriving at the current staff structure two years ago, the DOA made unauthorised, deliberate and offensive assumptions about my ability to return home, without contacting me and despite my consistently repeated expressions to the DOA that I wanted to return at that time.

"As a consequence, and put simply, there is no job for me to return to and no plans have been developed to allow me to return now or at any time in the future."

In 1998 the DoA sent Diana to Australia, to undertake a Bachelor of Veterinary Science.

"In making this decision, both the Director of Agriculture and the Sentor Veterinary Officer at the time made a far sighted and determined effort to alleviate one of the Falklands' greatest human resources issues; namely the lack of suitably qualified locals available to be engaged in many of our professional services," said Diana.

The DOA funded Diana's studies and living expenses throughout the five year course, whilst maintaining her as a permanent member of staff.

"The Department's intention in training me to become a vet was that upon my return home after completing my studies. I would take up the position of veterinary officer instead of relying on overseas contractors. This decision was founded on the previous success that the DOA had experienced in providing me with overseas training opportunities and eapitalising upon those enhanced skills upon my return."

Diana explained she and FIG were signatories to a contract that bonded her to return home and remain in-service for at least three years.

"For the past 18 months I have been unsuccessfully attempting to have FIG acknowledge the existence of the contract and to allow me to return in accordance with its terms," she said.

"At all levels of FIG administration my requests have been frustrated with ignorance of the contract, denials of my service status with the DOA, attempts to implement inappropriate FIG policies retrospectively, blame shifting, and distraction from the core issue," she said.

"Disturbingly, I have now been informed that FIG has allowed the in-service training contract to expire, effectively meaning that I am no longer required to return home, and that if I do want to return in the future that I am required to apply for a vacancy if and when one occurs; competing against all other applicants, including non-Falkland applicants.

One of the most pertinent questions, says Diana is, "...how can an agency justify the expense of hundreds of thousands of pounds training staff for specialised professions if they are unable to develop plans to effectively protect and obtain returns on these investments?"

FIGAS without General Manager

THE government's efforts to replace a head of department have again been foiled at the last moment.

Stefan Koehler who was appointed as the General Manager of the government air service (FIGAS) did not arrive in the Islands as expected last week and Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins has confirmed that Mr Koehler has withdrawn from taking up the post, "...despite very regular contact having been maintained over the past few weeks," he said.

Mr Simpkins said he is currently in discussion with another suitable candidate who was interviewed during the last round. However, he added that he did not anticipate that the discussions/ negotiations would be completed, one way or another, for at least another week.

In the meantime, Captain Derek Clarke continues to be Acting General Manager. Mr Simpkins said that Capt Clarke has his support and that of the FIGAS team in the role.

The staffing difficulties being experienced by FIGAS at the moment are, "...far from unique" said the Chief Executive, "... and serve to illustrate just how fragile staffing resources are in many government departments.

"That said, the situation is being managed as effectively as possible and I'm very grateful for the efforts being made to maintain as near normal service as possible by the whole of the FIGAS team," he concluded.

BREAST screening has been a subject of much discussion of late, prompted by the phone-in on the radio about health care.

A former councillor commented that he was surprised to hear councillors say they were of the opinion that there is a certain amount of money made available to the hospital and it is for the clinicians to decide how to prioritise that spend and not non-professionals. On previous councils there have been issues with the provision of money within the medical depart-ment. Funds were once made available for IVF treatment, despite the fact the professionals were of the opinion that there were greater priorities.

So, is it down to a lack of political will that the Falklands population is not able to be screened for what is statistically proven to be the biggest killer of ladies in the over 35s in the UK.

It would seem from recent years (and the amount of families in the Falklands who are affected in one way or another by cancer) that there is a high rate of the disease here - for the fortunate it is detected early. Dr Elsby has confirmed that there is indeed a high incidence of lymphomas, bowel cancer and male breast cancer in the Islands.

Colon and rectum cancer has been greatly reduced since 1994 when colonscopic screening in high risk families and sigmoidoscopic screening in the general population were introduced. Preventative medicine at work with good results.

Andy and Lynn Brownlee are proactive in raising awareness of the importance of breast screening and have made enquiries about the possi-bility of a portable mammogram unit from Chile visiting the Islands. The rough ball park figure they have at the moment for approximately 150 people to be screened in one week is £40,000.

Yes, it is a lot of money but I would hazard a guess that it is not much more than what is spent on an annual basis sending people overseas for screening and tests after a lump has been discovered. Unfortunately, by the time cancer has manifested itself into something that can be detected without the aid of a mammogram, it is often too late.

Surely not being able to find the money for something this important can be an excuse for not providing this hugely successful form of preventative medicine?

A road to nowhere was built last year on the West and just short of £30,000 was found to build a shelter in front of the 1982 memoral for the hour long June 14 service. While I fully support the concept of honouring those that attended this important event, (but can't for the life of me think of a suitable excuse for that road) I can't help but wonder if the prioritising should indeed be left in the hands of the professionals - it doesn't seem to be a particular skill of councillors.

New surface for Jetty Centre car park



MORE than 80,000 tourists will take their first steps in the Falklands this year on the resurfaced Jetty Centre carpark, without having to pick their way around the puddles as was the case

last season Work is underway on the car park this week, that should result in a clean, compacted surface with adequate drainage to prevent the forming of puddles.

Public Works Department (PWD) Design Engineer Chris McLean said the final surface will be well compacted, clean crushed stone. By "...creating a slope and adding up to 750 mm of stone, to

help the water to drain off the park-ing area," he said. Currently, most of the surface is a mishmash of concrete slabs, with no drainage to speak of, and the water settles in the low spots on, and adjacent to, the slabs

It is also planned to install chains and posts at the entrance/ exit, to prevent unauthorised ac-cess to the car park out of hours

Mr McLean said that by ensuring that the stone is placed and compacted properly, and that the top layer of stone used is free of mud, "... there shouldn't be any reason for a muddy mess

There are several simple facts she says. "I am, and still remain a permanent employee of DOA. with 21 years continuous and loyal service; I have been sent overseas by the DOA, to be trained for the DOA with training paid for by the DOA; The contract that under-pinned my return to service has been allowed to lapse by DOA, Despite repeated requests over the past 18 months. DOA does not have a job for me to return to now and cannot identify one for me to return to within the next decade.

"In the four and a half years since graduating, I have been employed as a practicing veterinary surgeon. This post-qualifying experience was agreed, at my suggestion and request, and has been undertaken for the explicit purpose of performing the return role back home

Diana says she has had no success engaging at any level within the FIG administration, including ... it is with Legislative Council. regret and exhausted patience that I now bring this matter to public attention

The government Chief Executive Chris Simpkins responded to Diana's allegations saying that the Falkland Islands Government is in dialogue with her about the possibility of returning to the Islands to work for FIG.

All staff employed by government need to meet the requirements for available posts whether sponsored by FIG for training or not." he said

"FIG will not comment on individual contractual issues through the press," said the Chief Execu-tive, who added, "The situation as described by Diana Miller is not necessarily accepted in its entirety. "A formal response will be provided to her very soon."

The North Falkland Islands oil explorer has announced that recent volumetric 2D seismic work has been completed on the company's leads and prospects in licenses PL023 and PL024.

The work suggests unrisked recoverable reserves of 2.5 billion barrels.

Executive Chairman Pierre Jungles said, "The data we have available to us is extremely encouraging and further reduces our exploration risk of the north Falklands basin. The target sizes in PL023 and PL024 provide confidence

This is also the case for recent

3D seismic data covering licenses PL033 and PL032. Oil was collected from these areas in 1998. The survey showed that both structural closures and fan type bodies can already be seen.

Rockhopper hope to receive the final processed 3D volume at the end of July. This survey was the largest of the three 3D surveys to be carried out in the North Falklands Basin. Once the final data has been analysed prospects will be ranked and drilling will be decided.

Mr Jungles is positive in his outlook: "Oil has already been recovered on licenses PL032 and PL033 so the fact that we can see structural closures and possible fans on our 3D seismic in this area is highly significant and increases prospectivity of the acreage." confidence in

Your questions answered

O THE Chris Doyle report published by Exco at the end of June says: "In December 2006 Cable and Wireless (C&W) submitted to FIG a proposal for a new set of prices for broadband services. I reviewed these proposals and made comment to the FIG, suggesting that approval could only be given if C&W supply FIG with an acceptable objective justification for the prices proposed.'

1. Does this mean that C&W is seeking to increase the cost of broadband services as well as having already reduced the available choices to users?

2. What is the justification given to date for any increase requested and does FIG intend to allow this?

3. If a cost increase is approved, will FIG permit customers the option to provide their own more cost effective services via VSAT or other services if they so desire? FIG appears to be looking at this as an option for the KEMH, according to the same report, which is surely an admission that current data services into the Falklands are restrictive!

The Government Secretary Pete King, supplied the following re-A Government received propos-

als from C&W in December 2006 to increase the cost of all broadband packages except for the entry level (250Mb) package. C&W stated that the reason for proposing the increases was because the company was losing money on the supply of some packages (which is why only the entry level is currently offered to customers).

However, the matter of broadband pricing became subsumed in detailed discussions with C&W regarding financial disclosure (to Government) and C&W's proposals for the replacement of the Camp telecommunications infrastructure: these discussions are ongoing and include negotiations on how a new service for Camp, which is currently estimated to cost in the order of £4.5 to £5.5 million depending on adopted timescale (for telephone, broadband and mobile) are to be funded.

Notwithstanding the above, C&W, in July, delivered revised broadband pricing proposals to Government and these are cur-rently being evaluated. The re-vised broadband packages have been redesigned into three sepa-rate packages which include low, medium and high usage. FIG has not yet decided whether to accept the proposals for broadband price increases and these will require referral to Executive Council in August together with justification for any increases. As regulator Government needs to be content that the proposed prices are rea-

sonable for the service provided. Dr Doyle has been asked for his comments

Government, of course, understands the immense value of broadband internet services to people in the Falkland Islands today for business, educational and social purposes and, therefore. wishes to ensure that the best possible packages are available at reasonable prices to meet people's needs.

Whether or not broadband price increases are approved, Government cannot authorise self-supply of telecommunications services (including broadband) using VSAT facilities because C&W has an exclusive licence until 31 December 2012 for the provision of telecommunications services in the Falkland Islands.

On the advice of Dr Doyle, Government did consider a VSAT option for the KEMH for the transmission of high resolution radiology reports (x-rays) to consultants overseas. This has not been pursued, however, because the KEMH has opted for an alternative solution using a web server facility and C&W's current broadband services.

O SHOULD there be a biological terrorist attack in the UK with a highly infectious agent such as Smallpox for example, what action would be taken in the Falkland Islands regarding protecting the population from infection^{*}

Would the Islands be "locked down" and how quickly could this happen? Who would make the decision and how long could the Islands endure a "locked down" state?

Government Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins provided the following answer,

A FIG has well developed contingency plans (which have recently been the subject of an external review by the Overseas Territories Disaster Management Adviser) to guide a response to a comprehensive list of risks including the possible transfer of health risks from overseas.

Additionally, the recently introduced Civil Contingencies (Emergency Powers) Ordinance provides wide powers to the Governor to make emergency regula-tions which may include, for example, travel restrictions. The strategy is to prevent any infection or biological agent from entering the Islands and thereby prevent or reduce illness.

However, completely closing borders is not regarded as a feasible option because of the need to import supplies, including medical supplies, and clinical staff where appropriate. Nevertheless, severe travel restrictions could be imposed.

In the event of any such incident, FIG will immediately secure the advice of the appropriate authorities in the UK.

Alex Jones surveys the **Islands creepy-crawlies**

sight in the Falkland Islands. The bug man, or Dr Alex Jones (to give him his scientific name) has been working for Falklands Conservation, on the 'Falkland Island Invertebrate Conservation Project' (FIICP), funded by the UK Darwin Initiative with addi-tional support from FIG.

The project has involved extensive surveys of the unique creepy crawlies of both East and West Falkland and numerous islands in the archipelago, and has resulted in the discovery of many new species, including a native 'scale insect' now named after the 'bug man' himself. The FILCP officially finishes

at the end of August and Alex is

currently in the Islands tying up loose ends.

One important aspect of the project has been the involvement of local people, and training courses in invertebrate conservation have been run annually for the last three years. As an extension of these courses Alex will be giving a presentation on his work on South Atlantic Islands including Gough Island in the Tristan da Cunha group. This will be held on July 31, at 7 pm at the Chamber of Commerce.

Anyone interested in learning more about the project, or just seeing some nice slides of South Atlantic biodiversity is invited to attend



Surely the price isn't right

LISTENING to the FIRS phone-in on Monday evening on the results of the Media Trust Healthcare Survey, I heard one of the hospital staff say that spectacles cost between £40 and £250 a pair.

I wonder if this was before the FIG 33 % mark-up, because my spec-tacles cost me £337.18 which is considerably higher than suggested. I know that the new system will charge differently, but Councillor Summers suggested it was govern-ment policy to make this charge.

I wonder how they justify the difference of £13.20 on a £40 pair difference of £13.20 on a £40 pair of glasses and £112.38 on a £337.18 pair. Surely the same administration costs would have applied to each pair. It would seem that FIG have been making a profit from this scheme.

Back to the debate; I noted that the forms sent out regarding the health survey was directed solely at those who had been on medical, yet Synergy chose to canvas the whole population on the electoral list. I filled in the form at the time as someone who has not been overseas on medical treatment, but have supported someone else on such a trip and there was nowhere in the form that allowed a non-medical person to fully have their say. For instance the form asked if you would be happy to pay a stated level of insurance etc. there was no box to offer you a choice if you were against it. Similarly there was no choice to say you did not feel happy about paying partial medical and flight and accommodation costs. If you are referred back to a hos-

pital for check up you are now asked to pay £400 towards the cost of air travel. This cannot be right as the patient is being sent back on the doctors referral and not on their choosing. This is more relevant if the patient is referred back because of the wrong diagnosis in the first place.

Councillor Summers made mention to user pays. I thought that users already pay through the taxation on their earned income. That after all is what the Government functions on. Does it mean that FIG are actually operating at a deficit in their annual budget?

There will always be a huge gap between those that can and those that cannot afford certain medical care, because the pay structure within the work place is so vastly different.

Medical and other costs are the same whether you are on £10,000 per annum or £90,000 per annum.

The survey seems to have been done to back up the administration's desire to have user pay for all costs because all the questions lead you to make that decision. Robin Goodwin



Year 9 SATs 'auger well for GCSEs'

DIRECTOR of Eduation. Barbara Booth says she is pleased with the results of the recent Year 9 standard assessment tests (SATs).

The tests are undertaken in English, mathematics and science. The expected attainment for pupils in the age group is Level 5 of the National Curriculum.

The recent results received by the Education Department showed that in English, 83.3% of pupils reached Level 5 or above, 60% in mathematics and 77.4% in science.

Mrs Booth was keen to point out that, "...what is more important is that 54 out of the 59 SATs tests undertaken, pupils met or exceeded their predicted levels of attainment." These are the target grades which pupils are predicted to get from an assessment which is made in Year 7.

That is 91.5% of pupils met, or exceeded their targets.

Mrs Booth said, "This is a very pleasing trend and augers well for their attainment in GCSE examinations in two years time."

She praised both staff and pupils for their commitment to raising achievement and also the two Acting Headteachers, David Higgins and Katherine Nelson who have managed the school "admirably" during this academic year.

Falklands Veterans raise Work in the Falklands £25k for Memorial Chapel 'a unique opportunity'

A WET summer in London, a period of time between jobs, and a unique opportunity: these are the thoughts that made me board an 18 hour flight to the Falkland Islands to undertake a short-term post as a pharmacist at King Edward VII Memorial Hospital

During my long flight, aboard a rather tired RAF 747. I had plenty of time to consider what may lie ahead of me

I've worked in many NHS hospital trusts throughout the UK stretching from Carlisle to St Mary's, Paddington, London, I'm proud that my British identity includes a socialist healthcare system: free healthcare for all. Back in 1945. they queued for hours in the street: people who had suffered silently for years from ailments they did not have the funds to remedy. Suddenly the end of sufferance, my grandparents were entitled to free healthcare.

Since the inception of NHS in the UK it has been a political puppet and is subject to continual serutiny and criticism. Having worked in the NHS I'm well aware of its failings: lengthy accident and emergency waiting time, hospital waiting lists, no access to NHS dental treatment, poor infection control. dirty hospitals. Unfortunately, the system is creaking under its weight: a conflict between financial control and an ever increasingly demanding public juggled by poor management.

Many of the problems of the NHS in the UK and the associated

bureaucracy had pushed me into journalism and publishing, where I have worked for the last 2 years. Sitting on the flight to Mount Pleasant I wondered if I may have to relive the days of working in a chaotic system, driven by targets, and plagued with low staff motivation?

On arriving in Stanley, I came straight to the hospital to put namesto-faces to those I'd been corresponding with at a distance. The first thing that stood out was the friendliness and cohesive nature of the stall at the hospital. Perhaps it's working in a smaller environment, the clean air, or may be something in the water, but the staff were ap-proachable, helpful, and most importantly, caring Now, I'm not claiming the opposite is true in the UK, however the level and availability of high-quality healthcare are certainly significantly different in the Falklands to that of the UK.

Having settled into my post I began to learn of the services on offer. I was amazed. It's everything you d wish healthcare in the UK could be Minimal waiting time at accident and emergency, same day appointments for a GP consultation. rapid access to repeat prescriptions. dental services for all.

The commitment to maintain a high quality of healthcare from the hospital staff, Islanders, and those in Government is an excellent quality to life on the Falkland Islands. I'm happy to have experienced working here, and to some extent. the experience has allowed me to imagine how my Grandparents might have felt at the inception of the NHS back in 1945.

Tiny limpet assists Antarctic research

A LIMPET no bigger than a coin could reveal the possible fate of cold-blooded Antarctic marine animals according to new research published this week in The Journal of Experimental Biology.

Compared to their temperate and tropical cousins, cold-blooded polar marine animals are incapable of fast growth.

Until now scientists assumed that a lack of food in winter was the major limiting factor. Studies of the protein-making abilities of limpets in both the sea around the British Antarctic Survey's (BAS) Rothera Research Station and in the laboratory aquarium reveal that these animals cannot make proteins the building blocks of growth efficiently

Lead author Dr Keiron Fraser

from the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) says,"This is an important step forward in our understanding of the complex biodiversity of Antarctica's unique ecosystem. Sea temperature is predicted to increase by around 2°C in the next 100 years. If cold-blooded Antarctic animals can't grow efficiently, or increase their growth rates, they are unlikely to be able to cope in warmer water, or compete with species that will inevitably move into the region as temperatures rise."

Growth in animals occurs primarily by making and retaining proteins. While tropical water limpets typically retain 70% of the pro-teins they make, those in the Antarctic appear only to retain about 20%

Racecourse issues to be revisited soon

WHILE public concern about the racecourse usually surfaces in the summer as the annual Christmas race meeting approaches, the future of the race course has been brought to the fore of late by an apparent deadlock between the owners, (FIC) and the government.

Asked to clarify how far discussions on this subject between FIC and the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) have gone, Government Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins responded as follows:-

"FIC believe that their land forming part of the racecourse is eminently capable of development within the terms of its designation in the Stanley Plan."

"This is not a view that is shared by FIG, because the Plan anticipates that development could not commence until an alternative site for the racecourse is available. Nevertheless, this policy does not prevent FIC, as owners, from ceasing to make their part of the racecourse available for events."

"In recognition of the importance of race meetings as part of the national heritage and social calendar. FIG has been in intermittent discussion with FIC about a land swap that would see the whole of the racecourse being owned by FIG.

The last contact was in January of this year when FIC rejected FIG's latest proposal on the basis that, in their opinion, the land offered by FIG did not provide equality of value."

"The matter is due to be revisited following the recent approval of a housing strategy and designation of the racecourse for housing will no doubt be an issue that is reviewed as part of the soon to be launched review of the Stanley Town Plan."

The Print Shop: making its mark on the day to day life of Islanders

WITHOUT us even realising it The Print Shop now plays quite a major part in our day to day lives.

Page 10

The vast majority of printed items we handle, including the newspaper you are holding now, are a product of this relatively new venture that is branching out into new areas at an impressive rate.

Whether you are filling in Standard Chartered Bank forms or cheques, looking for a number in the phone book, buying sweepstake tickets, dealing with government triplicates or looking at the menu in a restaurant it is sure to be a product of the Print Shop on Dean Street owned and managed by Steve Vincent

One and a half years ago Penguin News halted their practice of physically sticking stories and features together on A3 sheets and running up to the Government Print Office situated behind the Secretariat where they would be reproduced and collated to produce the paper ready for Friday morning

It's now a matter of digitally copying and pasting finished pages onto templates, saving them on to a flash drive or disc and popping them up to the Print Shop on Dean Street where plates are made and the printing gets under way. Unfortunately the files are too big to email or we wouldn't even need to leave our desks and anyway it is good to see the fruits of our labour flying out of the printing machines too.

When we have colour pages you can be sure that Donna May produced them on her beloved Two Tower four colour off set printing machine. Situated on the ground floor of the two storey building this beast of a machine looks capable of mood swings and tantrums but Donna pats it fondly and declares it a great bit of kit to work with.

Steve, from the Midlands in the UK, first visited the Falklands in 1981 and settled here in 1984 as a self employed electrician. He started Stanley Electrical in 1987 from his home, building the small shop on Dean Street some 10 years later.

Keen to get started in the printing world. Steve was offering a limited digital printing service while the extension to his small Stanley Electrical shop was still under way in 2005.

"We eventually took over the government printing office in May 2006, after FIG approached us the previous year." explained Steve.

The government's printing needs were only 15% of what their office was producing and it was considered time to privatise the business.

With contracts for the supply and maintenance of Xerox copiers in Stanley, Mount Pleasant and Ascension Island, we were already in the printing game and it seemed sensible to branch out," Steve said.

With the combined The Print Shop and Stanley Electrical business premises now almost twice the original size, they also took on the somewhat archaic government machinery. most of which was promptly discarded and a heavy investment in machinery followed



80 years since the arrival of the sailing ship Fennia

THE *Fennia* began her days as an impressive sailing ship and ended as a hulk beached on the River Plate, but for forty years she was a familiar sight in Stanley harbour.

Built by Forge et Chantiers in France and launched on June 7 1902, she began her life under the name of *Champigny*.

312 ft long with NRT of 2729, she sailed on June 18, to Penarth where she loaded cargo and sailed for Honolulu on her maiden voyage, making the journey in 131 days. She continued under this name until she was laid up in 1922 and was sold the following year to Finnish owners. Skolskeppsnederiet and renamed *Fennia*.

She sailed on her last voyage from Cardiff in February 1927 and made the Lemaire straits on April 28. Unfortunately she encountered many days of bad weather and was partly dismasted in a force 10 storm off Cape Horn on May 3.

The *Fennia* limped her way back to the Falklands and according to the register of shipping arrived in Port Stanley on May 17. with 42 crew on board.

The crippled *Fennia* was towed into Stanley Harbour and like many other Cape Horn veterans. condemned as a hulk and bought by the Falkland Islands Company in August that year.

She then served as a storage hulk at anchor in Stanley Harbour

for the next 40 years. She stored coal, wood, wool and other cargo during that period and during World War II had internees living on board, including some German Prisoners of war. Geoffrey Ham an associate of Sir Oswald Moseley (known principally as the founder of the British Union of Fascists) who was working here as a school teacher was arrested at San Carlos by the FIDF mounted Rangers and joined the internees on the ship. They were later taken to South Africa on the converted liner HMS Queen of Bermuda

In 1967 *Fennia* was sold to an American museum for restoration and a tug was sent from Montevideo to tow her away.

Attempts were made to unsieze the windlass to get it working as she still had a steam boiler on board for operating the cargo winches. Despite the best efforts of heating and using the claimed properties of Coca Cola as an unseizing agent it failed and the anchor chains had to be cut.

She made the tow to Montevideo but the project run out of funds and the hull ended its days beached in Paysandu on the River Plate.


A number of commercial stations followed until BFBS came a knocking three years ago. The Falklands is Ross's seventh location with the company and he's looking forward to getting stuck in.

THE Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) have come home with an impressive array of medals, having completed their most succesful overseas shoot to date.

A nine person team travelled to the UK earlier this month, to take part in the Central Skill at Arms competition which is run each year at the Pirbright/Bisley Range Complex.

The competition is based on combat shooting marksmanship. The shoots are designed to test marksmanship, fitness, mental concentration and teamwork (basic soldiering skills) in a controlled and competitive environment. The competition is split into three phases. Phase one is the (Regular) Army Rifle Association Operational Shooting Competition. This is open to all regular units and some overseas teams. The overseas teams shoot for honours only, except for certain matches in which there are prize structures for 'foreign' teams

The FIDF team only had a couple of days practice prior to the ARA competition, and used it as an opportunity to familiarise themselves with some of the more complex shoots. The finale of the competition is when the top 100 shooters compete for the Queen's medal. Four of the FIDF team qualified with their scores to take part in the QM final shoot, however as they were 'honours only' they were not permitted to compete in the final.

Next was the Territorial Army Rifle Association (TARA) competition. Run along similar lines to the ARA competition, the TARA competition is open to all TA units with some of the shoots open to TA units from other countries. The finale of the TARA competition is the selection of the top 50 shots, who, as in the ARA final, compete for the TA Queen's Medal.

for the TA Queen's Medal. As with the ARA the winner of the Queen's Medal is carried off the range in a specially constructed chair, to the accompaniment of a military band, and followed by the other finalists and spectators. Overseas teams are allowed to compete in the TA final, providing their scores qualify them to do so, and four of the FIDF team so qualified and took part in the final as 'extras' (the final consisted of 50 UK TA shooters plus the qualifying overseas contestants).

The final phase of Centsam is the National Rifle Association (NRA) Combat Shooting Competition. This is an open competition with various layers of prizes. There are trophies and gold medals for winners of the various shoots and any shooter getting a 'possible' is immediately asked to reshoot, in order to define the winners and establish qualification for bronze bars as the 'next best scores'. The prize system is quite complicated and for certain shoots there are special prizes for best TA shots. Some ARA and TARA matches have concurrent scoring systems logged for NRA competitions.

Privates Ross, Newton and Zuvic had never competed at this level before, and gave solid performances that were a credit to themselves and the FIDF.

The general performance of the team was the best we have had so far, with 58 medals/bars won. Coming second in the TARA Trophy team event was clearly a hight however the following list of FIDF results speaks for itself.

No vacancy for vet with 'limited experience' say FIG

IN RESPONSE to Dr Diana Miller's claims that £400,000 has been spent on her training the Government say they have in fact spent £214,000.

Last week through *Penguin News*, Dr Miller made a series of statements concerning the alleged failure of the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) to provide her with a job, following completion of her training as a veterinary surgeon in Australia.

While FIG does not usually comment upon individual contractual issues through the press, the Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins said in this case an exception has been made in order to, "...correct a number of statements made and impressions given by Dr Miller."

pressions given by Dr Miller." Mr Simpkins says that £214,000 has been spent on her training and that while Dr Miller has a contract of employment with FIG, she has not in fact, received any payment since December 2002.

As with higher education students fully funded by FIG, Dr Miller has not, at any time, been given an unconditional undertaking that she would be given a job as a veterinary surgeon upon completion of her training and post qualification experience, explained Mr Simpkins. "There is no vacancy for a vet-

"There is no vacancy for a veterinary surgeon with her apparent limited experience based upon the information she has provided," he said.

FIG requires its veterinary officers to have five years post qualification experience, three years of which should be in full time clinical practice and, since the opening of the abattoir, to be qualified as an Official Veterinary Surgeon (OVS) in order to perform duties at the abattoir if required.

Mr Simpkins said that on the information Dr Miller has provided, she is, "...apparently currently unable to satisfy this requirement and has refused to undertake training as an OVS.

"Despite repeated requests, Dr Miller has never provided a comprehensive account of her post qualification experience so that a proper assessment of her suitability for work in the Falkland Islands could be made. An 'abridged' CV was provided on July 3, from which it is impossible to evaluate her experience."

"FIG would not contemplate employing anyone on the basis of the limited information so far provided by Dr Miller," said Mr Simpkins.

According to the government's Chief Executive, Dr Miller proposed on July 3 of this year that FIG should engage her husband as Senior Agricultural Adviser and that she should initially be employed in a part-time capacity for approximately 12 months. "She thus attached conditions to her return which are unacceptable even if FIG had a suitable vacancy," said Mr Simpkins, adding that, Mr Miller's application for the post of Senior Agricultural Assistant was unsuccessful as a result of, "objective assessment."

He said the contractual position between Dr Miller and FIG has been assessed and a recommendation to the Governor is currently in the process of being formulated. Friday, August 3, 2007

APPLICATIONS for the post of Government Chief Executive have now been shortlisted to three, with one local applicant.

Keith Padgett the current Deputy Financial Secretary, Tim Thorogood and Richard J Davies have been named as the men to be interviewed for the post.

Mr Thorogood and Davies will travel to the Islands later this month when the candidates will make a presentation to elected councillors and the Governor, before being interviewed first by councillors and then the Governor.

Mr Thorogood was shortlisted for the post five years ago when he applied and is no stranger to the Falklands having lived here as a child when his father was employed by Cable and Wireless.

Councillor Mike Summers said that they are aware that there have been issues that have been made public relating to Mr Thorogoods resignation from a previous post in Swansea, adding "...we have been satisfied by the explanations provided."

Mr Davies is currently the Head of Department for Public Services and Performance for the Welsh Assembly Government.

Cllr Summers said it is hoped that a decision on who will take up the position will be made on August 24.

New Minister confims policy

DURING a recent visit to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office Councillors Mike Summers and Ian Hansen met with Meg Munn, the new Minister responsible for the Overseas Territories.

She had already had a fairly extensive brief on the Islands, but largely it was a chance to talk to her about issues involving the Falklands, said Cllr Summers.

No breach of employment contract

THE Falkland Landholdings (FLH) Board of Directors say they are satisfied that there has not been a breach of employment agreement after *Penguin News* questioned the conditions that Oscar Velasquez and his family lived in at Fitzroy.

The General Manager of FLH, Owen Summers and Chairman of the Board, Councillor Ian Hansen say that the suggestion that Mr Valesquez left Fitzroy because of living conditions is "rather misleading."

FLH claim that during the course of a discussion on why sheep may have been left after a gather off Fitzroy Ridge, Mr Valesquez demonstrated, "...serious threatening behaviour towards his manager and resigned immediately."

Cllr Hansen said FLH has a policy of upgrading all its properties occupied by farm staff as time and funding permits and that the house that was occupied by Mr and Mrs Valesquez is no exception, "...it has had double glazed windows fitted in the main living areas, the loft has been insulated, and it is central heated throughout."

The FLH representatives say that the suggestion that the house the Velasquez family lived in was damp may, "...unfortunately be as a direct consequence of their lifestyle.

"Approximately a week before Mr Valesquez resigned, the General Manager was requested to visit and view the house. At that time there was considerable condensation in the main living room and the back kitchen, and it was thought that boiling food for 40 hens every day was the direct cause," said Clir Hansen.

Subsequently the stove was moved to another position in the kitchen and an extractor fan fitted, also an additional radiator was fitted in the main living room.

Since the Valesquez's departure from Fitzroy a visit to the same property, by the General Manager (in the company of an FLH Board Member) has proved this to be true, said Mr Hansen, who added that the house is now warm and dry.

"Apart from just before his resignation when the General Manager visited, Mr Valesquez had never complained to the General Manager about the condition of his house, he also had recourse to the FLH Board," he explained.

"It is FLH policy that Farm Managers manage their own electricity supply within their budgets set with the Board and by comparison what happens at Fitzroy is little different to an individual who has their heating timed so that it is off at night," say Mr Summers and Hansen.

Mr Velasquez has since made efforts to obtain work on other FLH farms, as he has no desire to live anywhere but in the Camp.

Cllr Hansen said that when a position becomes vacant Mr Velasquez can of course apply, "...it will be the farm manager's decision on the relevant farm whether he is employed or not," he said.

Progress made on public smoking ban

DRAFT legislation in relation to a prohibition on smoking in public places has been prepared and discussed at a meeting of the working group on the prohibition of smoking.

The objectives as relayed by Executive Council are: to reduce passive smoking in the work place, prohibit smoking in enclosed public places and to reduce smoking nationally.

The general consensus of the meeting Councillor Andrea Clausen said is to introduce a ban and then look at cases for possible exemption, which should be kept "simple and clear."

She said there was a discussion on possible exemptions and that all points raised at the meeting will be noted for ExCo to decide on the way forward. She said the group had touched on the subject of criminality and reviewed how other countries with a ban in place were dealing with these matters. The AG's Chambers are undertaking some further research on options to progress in this area for the next meeting.

Cllr Clausen said she is hopeful that ExCo will then set a target for implementing the ban as soon as possible after the September meeting when the draft legislation will then have to go to LegCo.

Although she is happy that progress is now being made, Cllr Clausen said the majority of councillors have to support the legislation for it to be passed, "...so we are not there yet," she concluded.

Chief Executive will receive full gratuities

THE government's Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins is to receive full gratuities when he leaves the Islands next month.

At a meeting with councillors during farmers week last month, several farmers questioned the system whereby a person who does not complete the contracted term in office are still entitled to full gratuities on their departure. "It does not offer any incentive to complete the contract which when terminated early creates gaps in key posts due to the slow recruitment process," One East Falklands farmer expressed concern that the government system was so reliant on the Chief Executive that a short term replacement has to be sourced and suggested that the structuring should be altered to accommodate such occurrences.

Chairman of Standing Finance Committee, Councillor Mike Summers said that he has reviewed the arrangements for payment of final gratuity to Mr Simpkins and, "...is satisfied that they are correct." Clean, green, funky shopping bags | Damage to tip is costing £1,000s

FALKLANDS Conservation (FC) want you to do your bit for the environment by using their new funky string bags to carry home the weekly shop.

If you haven't traded your plastic bags for one of the Bags for Life supplied by some retailers in Stanley already, Falklands Conservation say they have the answer in the form of some very funky cotton string bags in a variety of colours, ideal for carrying home the weekly shop.

'Each bag will hold the equivalent of three plastic bags," said FC's Anna Shepherd, who added, "If you need an extra nudge to swap your plastic bags for an environmentally friendly re-useable one, take a look at some facts:

'Plastic bags don't biodegrade, they photo degrade, breaking down into smaller and smaller toxic bits contaminating soil and waterways and entering the food web when animals accidentally ingest them

Biodegradable bags are considered less harmful to the environment but still take at least 18 months for most to breakdown.

"Hundreds of thousands of sea turtles, whales and other marine mammals die every year from eating discarded plastic bags mistaking them for food."

Livestock also suffer. An autopsy of a calf in Australia revealed that it had eight plastic bags in it's stomach

'If that isn't enough to convince you to make the change," said Anna, Falklands Conservation

No charter flight for Argentine families

THERE has still been no firm proposal from Argentina with respect to a visit by familes to the Argentine Cemetery at Darwin planned for November 28.

Councillors have considered what their response will be, should there be a request for the families to travel to the Islands by air.

"If we were to receive such a request our response will be consistent with all the other responses we have given in the past about such issues - that the Argentines have banned the charter flights and therefore there can be no charter flights until such time as there is an indication that they are to be reinstated," said Councillor Mike Summers.

It is up to them to organise the visit and we will respond to the requests they make, he said.

Correction Last week we reported that the Falkands video recently launched by the Falkland Islands Government on www.falklands.gov.fk was I hour 33 minutes long. It in fact lasts11 minutes and it is not necessary to download the film in order to watch it.

SIGNIFICANT damage is being caused to the new Eliza Cove tip ramp which is costing the tax payer thousands to repair.

In December last year, the new ramp at the Eliza Cove Tip was opened which allowed the general public and waste handlers the option to dispose of their rubbish in a clean environment. Following only a few weeks of use, it was then necessary to close the ramp for approximately six weeks to enable repairs to be carried out as considerable fire damage had caused the steel framework to buckle and twist under the intense heat.

The repairs cost approximatley £3,000 and the ramp was reopened in mid-March.

The Public Works Department (PWD) in an effort to avoid further fire damage, placed signs around the tip to inform tip users that no burning was to be carried on or near to the ramp. An advert was also placed in the Penguin News to provide maximum coverage of the issue to the general public.

Works Manager Glen Williams says that since the initial repairs earlier in the year, PWD has had to deal with three separate fires, "...irresponsibly set by individual users of the tip.

Two of the fires were dealt with fairly rapidly, he said, "...thanks to sensible members of the public informing PWD staff of the dangerous situation the ramp was in," however on Sunday, a call from a concerned member of the public advising that a huge fire was well underway at the end of the ramp, was simply too late.

Mr Willians said Municipal staff were immediately called out to assess the situation and the burning debris was pushed away from the ramp, but the ramp had already sustained some damage.

Upon closer inspection the following day, it was ascertained that the concrete barrier protecting the steel work had been damaged as a direct result of the fire. A large crack had appeared in the concrete which protects the steel uprights and the face of the concrete had simply "burnt off" due to the intense heat. "This latest damage again has to be repaired at the tax payer's expense and it may also be necessary to close the ramp once again, whilst these works are undertaken," said Mr Williams.

"It would be detrimental to tip users if the ramp had to be permanently closed to the general public (i.e having to drive/walk through partly decomposed rubbish and mud. However as a result of a few individual's lack of respect for the general tip rules, there are limited options available should the constant damage to the ramp from uncon-trolled burning of waste continue." he said.

If anyone has any information as to whom may be causing the damage then they should either notify the Police or contact the PWD Works Manger, Glen Williams on 27177 10 e-mail gwilliams@horizon.co.fk.

The Police have advised that anyone found igniting fires on or near the ramp which results in damage to FIG property, may be liable for prosecution for criminal damage.

Skip truck driver found guilty of speeding

STANLEY man Raymond Poole was found guilty of speeding following a short trial on Wednesday morning.

Crown Counsel Julia Krayleyn-Smith told the court that on Saturday June 9, routine speed checks were being carried out by police of-ficers near to Sapper Hill. She said they saw a vehicle, which was later identified as a Leyland Daf skip lorry approaching, which appeared to be travelling at excess speed. The vehicle was registered as travelling at a speed of 52 miles per hour

Mr Poole, told them that the vehicle had a speed limit of 50 miles an hour. The Crown called two witnesses, Police Officer Steve Dent and also Sergeant Tom Whistler.

Mr Poole who did not have legal representation cross examined both witnesses. Mr Poole highlighted several issues and asked questions in relation to the visibility of the police vehicle when carrying out the speed checks as he said he did not see them, although Mr Dent said that there were lights on the vehicle and both Officers were wear-

ing high visibility vests. He also asked if the speed gun could have picked up another vehicle and Officer Dent said that this was not possible. Sergeant Tom Whistler was called as witness in relation to his role as the training and support officer and was asked

several questions by the Crown and Mr Poole.

MsKrayleyn-Smith said in her closing statement that the Crown had shown that the police had used correct procedure and had used the speed reading device properly to record a speed of 52 miles per hour.

Mr Poole also addressed the court saying that on the day in question he was returning from the abattoir and was not in any particular hurry. He said that he had checked his speed as he was following a few slow vehicles and had noted 35 miles an hour on his speedometer. He said that he did not accept that his lorry could go uphill at a speed of 52 miles an hour. He also pointed out that he was unaware of the parked police vehicle.

When asked about his speed limiter, Mr Poole said that the lorry came with it already installed and that it could not go faster than 50 miles per hour, that it had been tested with a hand held GPS.

JP Andrew Brownlee said that they had deliberated over the facts of the case at length, that Mr Poole had had ample time to gather the necessary evidence and witnesses but had not, so the court had to go on the facts presented.

Mr Brownlee said that the facts proved that Mr Poole had indeed been speeding and fined him £150 for the offence and also £150 prosecution costs. FIRS

Cllr Davies said he went to a couple of the sessions and although not a farmer thought that they were, "absolutely fascinating," adding that it is important that councillors have some understanding of agriculture and Camp life and also that they appreciate the considerable expertise and vision of many farmers who are struggling or working to overcome the challenges that face them.

Councillor Rendell said that he had heard a number of concerns during the week regarding the way in which Camp roads are regulated and said he would be addressing these at the next meeting of the Transport Advisory Committee.

Immigration needs to be properly controlled

IMMIGRATION is necessary but needs to be properly controlled says Councillor Janet Robertson

She said: "Recently I have had a few comments to the effect that unbridled immigration is placing an unsustainable burden on our services and undermining our Falklands traditions."

She said she wished to address this and to take into account that there are two sides to the issue.

"On the one hand, I can understand why people might feel that the Falklands' way of life is being eroded by a fairly steep rise in the population in the last few years, but on the other hand, our economy has been generally buoyant and there has been a demand for labour to fullil the needs that development has created."

Every job from customer assistant to plumber to doctor needs to be filled by someone, she said, adding, "If we don't have enough people in the Islands then quite simply, we need to look abroad in order to fulfil our labour market."

She warned that the alternative is to stop or regress development, which would only be possible if we are prepared to give up some of our modern comforts and return to some of our old traditional ways of self reliance.

" I know some people would like this to happen and they might have good justification for it, but we are all caretakers of the Islands for future generations. I doubt anyone under the age of 41 - as a random number - is liable to be thrilled by this concept," said Cllr Robertson.

Councillor Robertson stressed the need to ensure that our immigration system is properly controlled, and that processes and requirements are clear to all seekers of permanent residency. That criminal and health records are properly checked, that the system of entitlements is fair across the board and the principles of permanent residency and status are consistent and mean the same to everyone

She said we should ensure that our systems complement and not shrink the local supply of skills both current and future and advised that a report to this effect was being prepared by the council and should be available by the end of the year for public discussion.

THERE is concern among parents at the lack of child care facilities for children over eight years in the community, said Councillor Andrea Clausen.

"We rely on the majority of people of working age to work in this economy to make it work," she said

"I think that if one person from every couple actually walked out of their work for a week here, especially in the middle of summer there would be a massive impact. So we shouldn't just say, oh well go away and sort it out," Cllr Clausen said, adding, "...I don't think that Government should just deliver every thing for people either but I do think that we should help facilitate these things."

She said Government has a role to play as the biggest employer in the Falklands and should respond when approached to groups of people who have huge concerns.

Cllr Clausen said she hoped that some kind of proposal would be presented to Councillors in the future in order that they could help to facilitate it.

Departing Chief Executive applauds the spirit of commitment to public service

THE Chief Executive Chris Simpkins, attending his last Legislative Council thanked the House for the honour and privilege of being part of it.

He said he has always enjoyed and applauded the spirit of commitment to public service and the desire to do the right thing that has permeated discussions in the Council Chambers.

Mr Simpkins said that he and his wife Denise had enjoyed, "...a rare quality of life and a wonderful environment," during their time in the Falklands and that he had really enjoyed his job. He paid tribute to Denise's encouragement and enduring support in his career, for which he was, "eternally grateful."

Mr Simpkins referred to the spirit of public service within the Chamber, and commented that when he arrived in March 2003 he was immediately struck by the proximity of Government to the people it serves. "The community is immensely demanding of Government and it has to be said very often gets its way. I am bound to say that despite what some in the community believe, there is more and closer effective scrutiny of Government here than exists elsewhere."

He said elective representatives here are "accessible and vulnerable" to what can sometimes be very personal challenges. Mr Simpkins said that councillors are so susceptible to public approbation, "...that courage in shed loads and impermeable skins are vital qualifications to political survival, maintenance of personal sanity and domestic harmony." He added, "I take my hat off to councillors, your courage under fire is awesome."

Mr Simpkins awarded the same accolade to public servants. "For the most part I don't believe that such public criticism and attack is intended to cause personal grief but sometimes it does."

He said he has never been particularly bothered by controversy, although tries not to cause it, "...but now to quote a member of this House I am now going to go where others fear to tread.

Mr Simpkins then referred to what he called, "...the sport of contract officer bashing," by a minority of the public and within some isolated parts of the civil service itself.

"The desire for the Civil Service and the economy generally to be less reliant on imported skills and labour is a perfectly understandable laudable objective and one which I totally support, but anyone who believes that the Islands economy can thrive without importing such skills is quite frankly away with the fairies ..." Mr Simpkins said his experience is that by far the vast majority of Falkland Islanders know this.

"Senior public servants, including councillors particularly in a small community, are easy targets for vitriol because to some extent at least, it comes with the space."

Officials can't answer back at least certainly not in light terms, said Mr Simpkins, adding, "It is the partners and families who otten suffer, that is grossly unjust. It wears people down and it can eventually result in the loss of skills that cannot afford to be lost."

Mr Simpkins expressed amusement at the speed and effectiveness of the "diddle-dee telegraph," saying that if gossip were an Olympic sport, "...the Falklands would be challenging for gold every four years."

He concluded, "I wish to place on record my sincere thanks to all members of the civil service," and added that he had greatly enjoyed working with Councillors present and past.

He also thanked the armed forces with whom he said he hoped that he had been able to contribute a strong sense of common purpose and to the many Islanders who have been generous in their welcome and hospitality.

"We have enjoyed our stay immensely, farewell and thank you."

Extra teacher for the IJS as numbers increase

Annual audit on domestic fuel formula noted

A REPORT on the annual audit of the domestic fuel formula (DFF) was received and the content noted by ExCo.

The increase in fuel prices by 20.7% compared with 2004-05 can be explained almost entirely by the increase in the underlying cost price of fuel products," said Cllr Clausen.

"Stanley Services Ltd (SSL) achieves a significant economy by sourcing diesel fuel through a pooling arrangement, rather than through open market purchases from South American refineries."

The audit also noted that this saving more than compensated for the cost borne by the DFF for excess storage capacity for diesel fuel rather than by a third party who rents the spare capacity."

Prescription drugs free but charges for exercise

AS A result of Budget Select Committee deliberations in May, a further paper on the financial justification of the Exercise Referral Practitioner was requested alongside a paper on prescription charges.

Overseas option available for gall bladder removal

PATIENTS who require the removal of the gall bladder will now be able to opt for an overseas referral providing they pay 50% of the costs incurred.

ExCo have approved the development of a local policy for laparoscopic cholecystectomy in accordance with the recommendation from Health and Medical Services Committee (HMSC).

Whilst the principle that no funding should be provided for referrals for which a satisfactory

Council, ExCo have approved the planning application for the extraction of 300 tonnes of calcified seaweed from Spring Point on West Falklands for a temporary period until 31 July 2008, and that a mining licence be awarded to Mr Fraser McKay, subject to approval from the Secretary of State to an amendment to Section 11 of the Mining Ordinance allowing individuals to hold a licence.

successfully resolved. "For example, SSL have for the past 12 months promptly reported breaches in the minimum fuel stock levels, previously such breaches were rarely reported."

Cllr Clausen explained. As a result of negations on cost apportionments and the filling station shop, costs to the consumer have been reduced by £11.600 pa (equates to 0.1ppl); and errors in the calculation of stock financing will now save up to £19,000 pa, and payments will be backdated ιο 2004-05.

"The cost of outstanding contentious points amounts to less than the saving from the current stock pooling arrangement," she concluded.




An example in the last Council was IVF treatment. In the current Council an example is the funding of the Wool Company.

LegCo question for oral answer

Q4-2007: COUNCILLOR Richard Davies asked Councillor Andrea Clausen what obligations, if any, the Falkland Islands have under Annex 5 of MARPOL and to what extent are such obligations fulfilled?

Cllr Clausen thanked the Fisheries Department for their assistance with the answer and replied:

"The International Convention for the Prevention of Pollution from Ships (1973) was modified by the 1978 Protocol and is usually referred to as MARPOL '73/ '78 and it has a number of annexes, Annex 5, to which the question refers, addresses garbage and the disposal of garbage from ships. Annex 5 was extended to the Falkland Islands on the 14th of November 1995. And, as such, our obligations and/or commitments are:

"Firstly to ensure that all Falkland Islands Registered vessels subject to MARPOL'73/'78 comply with the provisions of Annex 5

"Secondly to ensure that port reception facilities are provided at ports and terminals according to the needs of the ships using them in compliance with the provisions of Annex 5, and thirdly to generally promote compliance with Annex 5."

In terms of delivery on these obligations. Cllr Clausen said she has been advised that: "Firstly vessels registered in the Falkland Islands subject to MARPOL'73/ '78 comply with the provisions of Annex 5.

"At port, reception facilities are available at FIPASS for ship generated garbage, in cases where large volumes need to be discharged, this is generally achieved through arrangements being made by the ship operator and their port agents.

"Restrictions are in place to prevent the discharge of plant and animal parts and products, which include much galley waste. This restriction is intended to avoid the importation of biological hazards and is part of the bio-security plan. It may be considered not to be entirely consistent with the intent of MARPOL. "The ability to handle such

"The ability to handle such waste safely here is limited. There is also a limited capability for collecting garbage from ships at anchor.

"Lastly, some general education and compliance work is undertaken by the Fisheries Department as fishing vessels visit to collect licences and at sea. Any vessel flagged in a state, which is a signatory of MARPOL, should be complying with the terms of the convention.

The issue of whether compliance with Annex 5 and possibly some other annexes should be made conditions of fishing licences has not been implemented but has been suggested.

Councillor Richard Davies said he had raised the issue because he thinks the issue of garbage dumping at sea is an important one. "As I am sure you all know, it causes considerable danger to marine mammals, fish and seabirds both by entanglement and by ingestion and it is therefore detrimental to our two main industries those of tourism and fishing. The economy and the environment are closely inter-linked."

Cllr Davies said he understood that a recent study of garbage on Volunteer Beach revealed that approximately 42% was discarded fishing equipment and another 39% was packaging and household waste, which is likely to have come from vessels. "Not necessarily fishing vessels," he said, adding. "I certainly didn't intend my question just to be directed to the fishing fleet."

He asked ClIr Clausen if there was any obligation to enforce the dumping of garbage by non-Falkland Islands registered vessels in the EEZ. "I am told anecdotally that quite a number of fishing vessels – not necessarily Falkland Islands registered fishing vessels dump garbage illegally in our EEZ. Can we or should we be trying to enforce compliance for those vessels?"

Councillor Clausen replied that she could add some further light in terms of general education and enforcement, which flows through from the MARPOL Convention. And, that there is a booklet, which is issued at Falkland Islands ports and harbours in which there is a section on harbour law which applies to all vessels. (Cllr Clausen then quoted a lengthy relevant passage from the booklet).

She said that it is an offence to dump some materials and that it is staged depending on how far away from land you are.

Councillor Davies asked: "So if we become aware through a Fisheries Officer or a Fisheries Observer that a vessel is dumping plastic waste in our EEZ, which, I think, are controlled waters within the Marine Environment Protection Ordinance, if we become aware of that, what action can be taken? Do we take any action?" He said he accepted that Cllr Clausen may not be prepared for that question.

Councillor Clausen said she would have to check to see what action they can actually take, adding that there was clearly some action that could be taken. "If it's observed by a Fishery Officer, it might well be that they might have more ability to take action than perhaps say an Observer. But I don't know and I would have to follow up on that to see exactly where those powers extend and to whom," she said.

Councillor Robertson then queried if there was any means of monitoring garbage disposal on vessels when they are at sea other than when they have a Fisheries Officer or Observer aboard.

Councillor Clausen advised that she did not have any information on this, but assured Councillors that she would raise this issue with the Director of Fisheries.

Osteopath now working from KEMH

ISLANDERS can now benfit from an alternative form of treatment with the return to the Falkands of a trained Osteopath.

Joanne Payne has recently started practising her form of complementary medicine in the King Edward Memorial Hospital as an osteopath. After studying at the British School of Osteopathy for four years she went on to work in two practices in Dorset and Somerset before returning to the Islands in May.

Osteopathy is a complementary medicine used for preventing and treating ill health. This is done using knowledge of anatomy and physiology as well as conventional medical procedures. Using a range of manual and physical treatments, osteopaths seek to restore the function of the body without using medication or surgery.

A variety of treatments are used, including, stretching and massage, articulation and manipulation to improve the ability of the muscles and joints. Treatment is used to correct mechanical problems manually as well as giving advice on diet, posture, lifestyle and exercise.

"Our main aim is to find the underlying cause of the problem rather than treating just the symptoms," said Joanne.

A wide range of conditions can be treated such as, neck, back and joint pain, sports and work related



injuries, headaches and migraines, sciatica, arthritis, problems during pregnancy, respiratory problems and stress.

"Osteopathy is not a cure all and there may be situations when referral to a specialist or surgical intervention is needed," warned Joanne, adding, "...however, osteopaths can work alongside other medical practitioners and can help with rehabilitation after surgery."

Appointments must be booked in advance either through the hospital reception or by calling Joanne on 55045. The initial consultation lasts up to one hour, with subsequent treatments being thirty minutes. Rates for treatment range from $\pounds 20 - \pounds 35$.

Obituary: Robert Smith, 1955 - 2007 | A sense of well being at Mount Pleasant

ROBERT William Smith, better known to friends and family as Bobby, was born in Stanley on January 21, 1955.

He was the second child of six born to Peter and Mary Smith. Some of his early life was spent on Bea-ver Island and later in Stanley.

Bobby left school in 1970 aged Is years. His first job was a boy labourer with the Public Works De-partment. Moving to Port Louis in 1973 he later returned to Stanley to work with Johnson Construction Limited on the construction of the Stanley Airport. After this he returned to the

camp, first to Roy Cove and then to Pebble Island before joining the FIC farms in Lafonia.

Bobby was a member of the Falk-land Islands Defence Force (FIDF). He joined in Stanley as a recruit and passed muster to get his beret. In Camp he took part in training exercises on the farms, usually under the instruction of the Royal Marine Detachment 8901 and proved himself a good shot with the Lee Enfield .303 rifle.

A keen competitor at the Camp Sports, attending at Goose Green. North Arm and Fitzroy where he participated in all events, dog trials, sheep shearing, wool handling during the Open Competition, horse racing, gymkhana events, football and darts - the ladies also say he was a good dance partner in the evening.

One of his favourite horses at North Arm, was Golden Fleece and Madonna was also another of his track specials.

Bobby always had a motor bike and later in life an old banger Land Rover.

He had all the skills necessary to make a useful shepherd/general.



a title given to one with all round experience in the varied trades of a Falkland Islands farmhand

He was often called BoBo or referred to as RWS. He enjoyed a good skylark and was a party animal

In 1982 he was interned in the Goose Green Community Hall as one of the 115. Of those incarcerated who have passed on. Bobby is number 2

Bobby passed away on July 17 aged 52 after suffering a short and painful illness and is now laid to rest alongside his old mate Nutt Cartmell in the Darwin Cemetery

His family was well supported at the Tabernacle service: the church was full and overflowing.

A large crowd gathered in the Community Hall at Goose Green before the burial service at Darwin where many had gathered to pay their last respects to a likeable character, he has left indelible memories of his part in the lives of those that knew him

Bobby was buried with his FIDF. beret and badge and a bottle of Heineken, for the track to his final resting place.

Loligo season underway with modest catches

THE loligo season has commenced with modest catches, Director of Fisheries, John Barton said when reporting to the Fisheries Committee on Tuesday.

He said that the second loligo season has commenced with modest catches and that the Loligo was, "...fairly well distributed." throughout the area this year.

Hake is also widespread in the zone; however the fleet continues to experience on-going by-catch problems.

A number of scientists from the Fisheries Department will travel to Imperial College in September as the department continues to takeover more of the scientific work, said Mr Barton.

A paper which considers introducing the Automatic Identification System (AIS) as a licence condition in Falkland Island waters was also discussed at the meeting. One of the main advantages of the AIS system is its benefit during search and rescue, it allows the target vessel to be easily identified and therefore could save valuable time in an emergency situation.

Sustainability measures in the fishery were also discussed and it was agreed that up to 15% of the TAC (Total Allowable Catch) for toothfish may be carried forward to the following year or brought forward from the next year.

This adjustment is only permitted from one year to the next and cannot accumulate," said Mr Barton.

It will be reviewed yearly and any revision of the overall TAC could override the adjustments.







# Year 6 are Islands' first young lifesavers

TWENTY-three children from Year 6 in the Infant and Junior School have received their St John Young Lifesavers Award certificates.

The class, who are the first in the Falklands to achieve this award, gathered at Government House on Tuesday to receive their certificates from His Excellency the Governor, Alan Huckle. Teacher Jackie Adams said the class have been taking lessons each week for a year, adding that she was "very pleased" that every student had passed the course.

The course mainly involved practical work, and some of the students gave a demonstration at Government House in front of the Governor and Mrs Huckle and family members, of life saving techniques. Year 6 had to pass several modules to gain their certificate. Within 10 days of passing an early module, two of the pupils had call to put their new skills to use when they were required to make an emergency telephone call in a first aid incident.

"I am really proud of them, they are a great bunch of kids" said Ms Adams.

#### Councillor's wages should not be an incentive to stand for election

THE Government's Chief Executive and a small working group are striving to strike a balance between making it possible for anyone to stand for election without losing too much of their income, without offering monetary reward that would encourage the less discerning to offer their services simply to obtain the income.

The Falkland Islands Government (FIG) has announced that, as part of the discussions on the review of the Constitution, it has concluded that the time has come in the development of internal self government for the option of full pay to be made available to councillors.

Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins said it should perhaps be emphasised that there is no intention to change the role of councillors in terms of the work they do and in particular, the relationship with paid officials will not change.

Mr Simpkins was asked to bring a small group of people together to, "...advise on what would be an appropriate level of full time pay for a councillor, if and how pension payments/entitlements would be appropriate, and any other remuneration issue."

Full pay for this purpose is defined to mean, "...receiving an appropriate wage for delivering a full commitment to service as a councillor," similar to that of a UK backbench MP, said Mr Simpkins.

Councillors have it in mind to introduce any scheme approved from November this year, which will be half way through the life of the present council.

Members would make personal decisions as to whether to accept full pay or to remain on the present expenses system. Currently, that system provides a basic annual, nontaxable, allowance of £3,477.48 plus a daily rate for time spent on specific duties, both here and overseas. of £105. Additionally, an annual payment for portfolio responsibilities is made. The amount varies from £472.50 to £3,307.50. Taking all these allowances into account, the average amount drawn per councillor in 2006 was £16,064. Mr Simpkins invited Roger Spink, President of the Chamber of Commerce, Nick Hutton, Manager of the Standard Chartered Bank, and former Councillor Stephen Luxton to assist him in the formulation of a scheme. They will submit their report to ExCo later this month.

"We have looked at the amount of time that councillors devote to their duties; the level of payments made in other Overseas Territories and governments, and made comparisons with schemes of payment paid to councillors in the UK local authorities, however, none provide direct comparisons with the situation in the Falkland Islands," Mr Simpkins explained.

He said the group want to ensure that any scheme of payment strikes a balance between making it possible for anyone to seek election without suffering an unacceptable loss of income, whilst not encouraging people to stand for election simply to achieve an income. *Continued on page 2* 

#### Stay vigilant to prevent F&M entering Islands

WITH Foot and Mouth (F&M) disease discovered to be present on two farms in the UK, steps are being taken to prevent the possibility of it being carried into the Falklands by incoming passengers on MoD and LAN flights.

The state of play at the moment, although things may change as more information comes to light, is that today's passengers on the incoming MoD flight will be asked to clean all footwear, both on their feet and in their luggage and the same will apply to UK passengers on the LAN flight tomorrow.

The implications for the Falklands should this disease enter the Islands are enormous with the level of sheep shifting that takes place to get animals to the abattoir, said Senior Veterinary Officer Vie Epstein.

The virus is resilient and can survive for long periods of time in meat, meat products, dairy and dairy products of all cloven hoofed animals (ie sheep, cattle, pigs) and in contaminated mud and inanimate objects. "This is why we import these products from F&M free countries and with sanitary certification," he said.

The seriousness of the situation serves to give Falklands' farmers more insight into why movement certificates are important and why they need to be filled in, added Mr Epstein.

Meanwhile his message is, "Don't be alarmist, be vigilant."

#### New Senior Magistrate to take up post soon

THE Falkland Islands Government have announced the appointment of Alison Thompson to the position of Senior Magistrate.

Miss Thompson is a Batchelor of Science and Barrister and was called to the Bar in 1986. She has extensive experience, including two years as a Magistrate and Coroner in Hong Kong. She is currently the Coroner for the Greater London (Western District) which post she has held for seven years.

Miss Thompson is expected to arrive at the end of the month and will immediately begin her duties.

A SHARP explosion early on Friday evening heralded another victim of the landmines indiscriminately placed by invading Argentine forces 25 years ago.

A bullock had forced its way into a minefield and was killed instantly when it happened upon a land mine while grazing. Its head was blown off and the remains scattered over an area of 200 meters.

While these might seem like gory details to share, they serve as a brutal reminder of not only the danger that Islanders have lived alongside for the past quarter of a century but also of the good work carried out by the JSEOD 'Bomb Disposal' team - a group of lads that have been here since our liberation in 1982 with everyone's safety in mind.

For some of us living at Fox Bay after the war, the memories of dazed, maimed animals staggering around on three legs after stepping on antipersonnel mines are still fresh. The Engineers and EOD teams risked their lives then as they tried to establish where the minefield perimeters were and fence them off to prevent animals or people straying into them.

Several settlement workers drove over mines in tractors while trying to put wounded animals out of their misery in those early days and luckily the machinery always bore the brunt of the explosion. All because the minefields had not been marked as the Geneva Convention requires. The mines had in places, been carelessly scattered around by the Argentines - an action that had caused injuries and death even to their own men.

Sincethose early years following the war when unfortunately there was injury caused to service personnel, there has, thankfully, been no further injury or loss of human life and this is no doubt as a result of the good work carried out by the EOD teams over the years. This is one of those areas where particularly in the civilian quarter, education is key and that there has never been an incident involving children could be an indication that the regular appearance of Redfire at social events and that yucky army boot with the very realistic severed foot in it at school education sessions, has kept the Islands still one of the safest places in the world for children to live.

It takes a special sort of person to go to work each morning knowing that they may be handling or having to deal with potentially life threatening materials, particularly after 25 years the ordnance has to be at best unstable and at worst volatile.

So. EOD personnel, past, present and future while you are quietly, going about your work (well not always, some of those bangs scare the hell out of me!), know that you are an appreciated, essential and most welcome part of our community.

#### Councillor's wages under discussion

The issue of the level of pay for councillors can, of course, be contentious. In October 2006, an Independent Panel formed by the London Boroughs reported their findings following a review of the pay for councillors elected to serve on London Borough Councils. "We were struck by the following statement in the Panel Report with which we entirely agree." said Mr Simpkins. "We are well aware that mem-

bers' allowances can be conten-tious. But we are emphatic that the quality of local democracy depends on the ability of Councils to attract able people to serve as councillors. Excellent Councils have excellent members. Financial reward is not and should not be the main motivation for service as a councillor. But a reasonable remuneration can make it possible for a wider range of people to stand for election. In his interim report on local government, Sir Michael Lyons (former Chief Executive of Birmingham City Council) comments that councillors are gener-ally underpaid for the vital work which they do. We entirely agree. We believe that Councils have a duty to ensure that their scheme of allowances is realistic.

Mr Simpkins, Mr Spink, Mr Hutton and Mr Luxton are close to forming their recommendations but, before doing so, are holding a public meeting in the Court and Council Chamber at Spm on Tuesday. August 14 when they hope that members of the public will attend to express their views. They also welcome written comments, particularly from Camp residents and these should be made to the Chief Executive at the Secretariat by not later than August 20

At this stage the group are minded that the scheme should have the following features:

1. To begin with, the annual payment, which would be taxable, should be based on a multiple of the current allowance of £105 per day. As is the case now, any actual expenses incurred would also be reimbursed.

2. A small additional payment for the Council Spokesperson.

3. Councillors opting to accept the payment would be expected to devote their full time to their duties as a councillor but would not be expected to refinquish all other business interests.

4. Councillors opting to accept payment would join the government pension scheme.

5. Councillors who fail to be reelected at a General Election would qualify for a statutory redundancy payment and pension payment should continue for a defined, but limited, period.

6. The scheme should be reviewed after six months' operation ie in April 2008 and then again in November 2009 after the next general election. The new Council would, if it so chose, have the option to abandon the scheme.

#### Deep-sea Southern elephant seal study

NEW technology has allowed an international team including UK scientists from University of St Andrews and the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) to witness for the first time the behaviour of the Southern elephant seal and how it relates to its physical environment.

Small sensors were attached to 85 seals to track their movements and collect data about their marine environment. Results have been published this week in the journal Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences. The seals were tagged at the is-

The seals were tagged at the islands of South Georgia, Kerguelen and Macquarie in the Southern Ocean, and at the western coast of the Antarctic Peninsula. The data from the seals was transmitted back to land via satellite and shows that elephant seals adopted different strategies to find food. The Sea Mammal Research Unit at St Andrews University led the research. Author Mike Fedak says, the Georgia fed within the Antarctic Circumpolar Current, but seals from other locations had a very different strategy, and visited colder waters nearer the continental shelf. He added, "This approach helps us to understand current population trends, where the animals forage and predict the availability of food under various climate change scenarios." Dr Mike Meredith, Head of the

Dr Mike Meredith, Head of the Atmosphere and Ocean Group at BAS says, the Southern Ocean is the hardest place in the world to obtain oceanographic data, "...especially during the wintertime.

"...especially during the wintertime. "The seals acted as 'samplers' to collect data from deep seas that we couldn't ordinarily access due to their remoteness and harsh environments. Understanding how these animals respond to their environment is fundamental in predicting how they may respond to climate change and the consequent shifts in ocean circulation and ice dynamics."

#### Fishing company loses appeal at low | Sukey and Howard wed at St Paul's quota allocation under new system

By Gary Brown SOUTH ATLANTIC Marine Services Limited (SAMS) has lost its appeal against the Director of Fisheries, John Barton

Delivering his judgment this week, following the Supreme Court hearing at the beginning of July, Chief Justice Mr Christopher Gardener QC stated that he was, ....unable to accept the submissions," put forward on behalf of David Eynon's fishing company SAMS

SAMS was aggrieved at its squid and restricted finfish quotas awarded under the new and lucrative Individual Transferable Quota (ITO) system. The company argued that because one of its vessels caught fire and sank in 1999, they were effectively one boat down during the period when ITQ entitlements were decided. This left their quota significantly depressed. They asked a special Commission to make an exception and increase their entitlement, but that body decided it had no power to do so

Richard Marlor on behalf of SAMS argued that whilst the Director of Fisheries was given criteria on which to decide quotas namely total catch between the years 2000 and 2003- Mr Barton had the discretion to make a special case in extenuating circumstances such as those facing his client. Not taking SAMS situation into account in deciding quotas was "unfair," especially as the quotas would be fixed for the next 25

years, he said.

Acting Attorney General Robert Titterington disagreed, saying that the Director of Fisheries had no discretion. The criteria for determining ITQ entitlements were a matter of policy and were set by the Governor in Executive Council. Mr Titterington said the Director of Fisheries had no option but to apply those criteria, even if he sympathised with the situation SAMS found itself in.

In a surprising twist the Acting Attorney General produced several documents and emails after the hearing showing that Mr Barton raised Mr Eynon's complaint with the Governor, but the Governor instructed him not to make any concession.

When this was revealed, Mr Eynon's case was at an end and the Chief Justice upheld the previous decision that the company's quota could not be varied. Nevertheless, he sympathised with SAMS that these documents were produced so late in the appeal.

But this is not be the end of the voyage for SAMS. The company has taken the option of judicially reviewing the Governor in ExCo's decision, effectively saying that the decision not to take the sinking into account was unreasonable or improper

Chief Justice Gardner QC granted the application for leave to apply for a judicial review in the Supreme Court on Thursday via a telephone conference link.

#### Diana honoured on a 60p stamp



WITH the 10th anniversary of the untimely death of Diana, Princess of Wales coinciding with the Falklands celebrating and commemorating 25 years since the Liberation from occupying Argentine Forces, the Falkland Islands Post Office feel it only appropriate that they should honour the late Diana by depicting her on a single stamp.

The 60p stamp shows her in Angola walking through a minefield as part of her personal challenge to try to change a small piece of the world. As we heard during the charity memorial concert for Diana earlier this year, so keen was she for these images to be seen around the world that she offered to complete the walk a second time.

The single stamp is produced in sheetlets of eight stamps and two labels.

The labels depict the former Prime Minister of the United Kingdom, now Baroness Thatcher of Kesteven, taken in 1983 whilst viewing a minefield in the Falkland Islands shortly after Liberation.

In the surround of the sheetlet is printed the staggering information "It is estimated that 20,000 land mines still remain in the Falkland Islands in an area covering approximately 20 square kilometres." The wording 25th Anniversary of the Liberation of the Falkland Islands appears on the labels only.

The Falkland Islands Post Office hopes that this tribute to Diana, Princess of Wales will help to remind the world of the importance of those causes which she so fondly embraced and some of which are sadly, still relevant today.

The First Day Cover continues on this theme with another portrait of Diana in protective clothing by a skull and crossbones sign with the Portuguese words 'Perigo Minas' and 'Danger Mines.'

#### Bullock ends days in minefield



ON a Friday evening one could be excused for thinking that the Joint Services Explosive Ordnance (JSEOD) team would be winding down at the end of a busy week wrong

A bullock wandering into a minefield near Clam Shell Point and consequently being blown up by a landmine was to cause some extra hours for the ream.

Reports were arriving at their indistinctive Portakabin office at Hillside Camp of an explosion that had rattled windows all along the waterfront of Stanley.

Most witnesses claimed the explosion came from the Yorke Bay area, so members of EOD, the Fire Service and the Royal Falkland Islands Police were sent to check this out.

The light was fading fast in poor visibility and no area of Yorke bay or Cape Pembroke was found to have any damage that would indicate that a large explosion, such as that heard by the town could have taken place.

At six o'clock after darkness had fallen a report came in that a plume of smoke had been spotted on Wireless Ridge. The EOD lads swapped their Land Rover for the all terrain BV206 and moved to Fairy Cove to investigate the reason for the explosion.

All the minefields in the area were checked. All the fences were found to be in good condition with no repairs required, but because of the lack of light the seat of the explosion nor the reason could be

plosion nor the reason could be identified

"There were no reports of a missing person, so it was then decided to return to Hillside and continue the investigation in daylight," explained Q-Mines, W2 Powell.

EOD moved onto Wireless Ridge in the morning to find that the landowners (FIC Ltd) had already discovered the reason for the explosion. "It's thought that the bullock entered the minefield around the beach at low water, " said FIC General Manager Roger Spink, adding "...this is something that we will definitely try to rectify."

The bullock had been a member of a herd of 13, "doublecky for him," commented Q-Mines as the hapless animal, which no doubt had considered the grass to be greener on the other side of the fence, was by this time distributed over an area of some 200 metres near the beach.

With the animal completely decapitated. Mr Spink wondered whether it had attempted to lick or chew the landmine.

EOD have since identified at least one more landmine close to the remains of the bullock, which will be dealt with in the future.

"This incident with the exploding bullock and the identification of another mine is a timely reminder for us all that the mines are as dangerous today as they were 25 years ago," concluded Q-Mines.

#### Development Corporation look at shipping services

DUE to an emergency with another ship. *Tamar FI* has been unable to dry dock in Punta Arenas but has managed to carry out most of the work required in Stanley, including some major work to the engines. FIDC General Manager Mark Brunet, told a meeting of the Board on Tuesday.

Some welding work to the ship will still require dry-docking however, and this will be carried out in September, he said.

The Development Corporation has been asked by the government to manage the contract with Workboat Services for the new ferry service, "...and to project manage the introduction of that service," Mr Brunet explained.

He said he considered this a tribute to the excellent work done, "...in particular by Tim Cotter, in ensuring that the *Tamar* runs properly.

"We are still identifying exactly the scope of what FIG wants us to do, but we anticipate that the amount of work required once the service is up and running will be less than we currently do with respect to the *Tamar*," said Mr Brunet.

Bearing in mind that there is a lot of work still to be done before the service starts, a series of workshops around the Islands have been undertaken by FIDC this week to establish what commercial opportunities the new service will offer.

"At the same time we will be project managing the introduction of the service itself and coordinating the many people involved," said Mr Brunet.

In short, the local residents' association said that the families would not be welcome, she said, adding, "We are extremely disappointed by these objections, as are thousands of others and have written to the local council supporting SSAFA's planning application."

ON Friday one of the Islands largest pieces of machinery in the form of a crane owned by Neil McKay, capsized when undertaking a lift near the Ashphalt Plant.

A stabiliser on the 65 ton crane found a soft patch while lifting an ashphalt decanter onto a government trailer and rolled onto its side.

Operator Brian Middleton was unhurt but shaken by the incident. The task of lifting this massive

The task of lifting this massive machine upright was undertaken by the government's D8 and a smaller crane owned by Mr McKay.



Damage to the crane is not great but will require spares from the UK and a test before it will be back in action, Mr McKay explained.

As this is the only crane that can lift 22 ton containers from the ships at FIPASS they will now have to be partially unpacked before being off-loaded onto the dock.

#### Preventing crime is most important

HAVING read the court report on Raymond Poole's speeding offence last week I feel that some questions should be asked.

While I have no problem with a speeding driver being fined it is the way in which they are caught that I take issue with.

Officer Dent is quoted as saying there were lights on the police vehicle (assuming he was accurately quoted he did not say they were in fact turned on) and that the officers were wearing high visibility vests.

There are indeed lights on most vehicles but in the case of police vehicles only the blue lights can be seen from all angles, I have never seen a police vehicle doing speed checks with their lights on as they are normally parked facing across the road not towards oncoming traffic.

They can also usually be found somewhere where they are obscured until you are very close, such as is the case when they do speed checks to the east of the cemetery.

As much as obeying the speed limit is important the police should also strictly follow the rules in how they carry out such checks, after all preventing the crime in the first place is more important than gaining statistics.

#### **Obituary: Jim Kerr 1922 - 2007**

JIM Kerr was born on 17 June 1922.

He was employed by the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) as a pilot, on the contract conditions of that time, in September 1954.

He trained to be a pilot at a very young age and by the end of his career had logged an impressive list of 17 different types of aircraft from the DH.82A Tiger Moth to Avro Lancasters I and III and the Beaver De Havilland sea plane and Islander aircraft he flew in the Islands

School children of that time will remember the pilot as he bundled them into the Beaver float plane at the hangar in Stanley to be transported to various holiday destinations.

While continuing to fly, he later became the superintendent of Civil Aviation and in his latter years the first Director of Civil Aviation.

For much of his time he shared the pilot work load with Captain Ian Campbell.

In 1975 one of the entries in his log book shows 8,265 flying hours. On June 12, 1965 Jim was awarded an MBE by Her Majesty




the Queen.

He retired from the civil service in May 1980 having spent the last year or so flying the recently introduced Britton Norman Islander that we still have today.

His successor Gerald Cheek worked with him for the last four years of his service.

Jim was married to Joyce, a familiar voice on the radio at that time and they had three daughters, Cherry, Jane and Julia.



# Conservation seek help in tracking tagged turkey vultures

THE appearance of a large square contraption of orange net at the Eliza Cove Tip, close to the upper minefield fence may have caused some to think it is an artistic installation or a Mongolian yurt, however it is a temporary walk-in trap for turkey vultures, so that individual birds can be caught and tagged.

Next week two researchers from the States - Keith Bildstein of Hawk Mountain Sanctuary and Marc Bechard of Boise State University

 will be trapping and banding tur-key vultures for the purpose of collecting information on their home range, habitat usage and roost site locations. It may seem that each evening it is the same turkey vulture in the macrocarpa in your backyard but previous study in Penn-sylvania and Maryland found an average home range for turkey vultures to be 27,050 hectares in summer. 12.773 hectares in winter, and 37.072 hectares year-round, and that some roost sites are more like motels with a maximum capacity but different guests each night.

Director of Falklands Conservation (FC) Grant Munro says the information collected from this study will be important because it will shed light on how far each individual turkey vulture forages, and therefore provide an understanding of the potential for short-term or longterm population movements of turkeys within the Falklands.

The researchers will spend one week, trapping at Eliza Cove using the walk-in trap. Bait inside the trap is used to attract the turkeys and once they enter the researcher can release the swing-closed door thus





trapping the bird inside the enclosure. Keith and Mark will try to capture and tag up to 20 turkey vul-tures. Each marked bird will wear a numbered plastic flap on one wing that will be visible when the bird is in flight or perched. This tag is attached in much the same manner as cattle ear-tags

Mr Munro says the the study will be greatly aided by observations made by the general public. "If you see a tagged turkey vulture it would be fantastic if you could please record where you saw the bird, the date and time, the number, colour, and side of wing marker, give a short description of the bird and it's activity and your name and address."

To keep things easy a simple recording sheet will be available from Falklands Conservation and if records could be returned to Falklands Conservation they would be very grateful for anyone's assistance

For the more dedicated, or those who perhaps need to walk dogs, FC are also looking for volunteers to walk around Stanley and locate

marked Turkey Vultures in the evening and morning hours near sunrise and sunset when birds are roosting or to visit Cape Pembroke during the same times to watch for marked vultures who roost on the Tussock Islands to the north of Cape Pembroke (where binoculars will be essential to note down those numbers). Again contact Falklands Conservation if you are interested.

This research is part of the Raptor Programme that Falklands Conservation has run over the past year with funding from the FIG Environmental Studies Budget, Edinburgh Zoo and Hawk Mountain Sanctuary. The aim is to obtain a Falklands population estimates for johnny rooks and turkey vultures. Brandon Breen, the "turkey-man". has visited the Falklands twice, in summer and winter, and driven several thousand miles at an almost sedentary 20 miles per hour to measure bird densities and hence obtain an approximate population estimate of turkey vultures in the Falklands

Brandon left last week but would like to thank everyone that helped him during his time in the islands and apologise for those he "heldup" on the road. He will now be working on the survey figures he obtained. "It is hoped that the programme can continue and that follow-up research can more closely focus on the interaction of birds with farming and could likely include putting radio transmitters on birds to gather more detailed information on habitat usage and foraging," said Mr Munro

I got itchy feet in 2003 and embarked on a 12 month round the world trip which took in most of South East Asia, Australia, New Zealand, some South Pacific Islands and America. It was a year I look back on as a once in a life time experience, getting to do such things as walk along a deserted Great Wall in mid winter, trek around the hills of Thailand, and dive on the Great Barrier Reef.

Travelling also provided me with the best job I have ever had, when I managed to pick up three months of work at Sydney trainer, Clarry Conners' racing stables, riding out his racehorses round Warwick Farm race track, and also working as a stable hand, taking horses to race meetings.

Unfortunately, as with all good things, there was to be an end, and I returned to the UK in 2004 and went back to work for the company I had left to go travelling. I have been with them now for more than three years, and continue to site manage construction projects for Network Rail, Local Authorities, the Environment Agency and the Highways Agency in the South of England.

I have also recently started up a new business with a good friend



of mine called 'Floatnation', which is a float tank and holistic therapy centre. After several years of drunken discussion, then some careful planning, and a lot of hard work, we opened the centre in December 2006. It has been a long seven months of trading, with many ups and downs, and although floating is a new concept to a lot of people, many are starting to adjust their work/life balance, with well-being much more of a priority.

I try and find time to turn out for my local Sunday League football team, and also play the winter months in the Reading and Aldershot badminton leagues. This October I am looking forward to representing the Falklands in Greenland, when I will be part of the badminton team that is going along to compete against the Island Games nations.

Whilst I never like to plan too far ahead, I live in hope that a flourishing business will keep me in this part of the world for some time, or better still will afford me the opportunity to open a franchise in Bermuda!!

But, on a more short term realistic level, I hope to return to the Falklands soon, for a sun drenched Christmas Sports meeting, where I can catch up with all the reasons I wish it were only a 10 minute bus ride home.

# Nadia and Marcus share their college experiences: 'It's the best thing we've ever done'

AT this time of year it often seems that, like birds migrating North people drift away in search of the sunand holiday adventures, however so too do the young people flock back to the Falklands from their college and university education.

These young people are taking the first steps in being independent and at the same time have to cope with being some 8.000 miles from home, no longer surrounded by family and the friends that they most likely started primary school with

So, how difficult is it to make the transition from secondary education at the Falkland Islands Community School (FICS) to a busy college environment in a large English city, to university or to take up work and find your way in the world?

Marcus Porter is studying popular music at Chichester and is determined that his musical ability will one day earn him a living. If he doesn't make the big time he will teach it, but there is no doubt in his mind that it is at the core of his future.

After he has completed his two years at Chichester he hopes to go on to do a degree at the Brighton Institute of Modern Music "It's regarded as one of the most successful in the UK and I've heard a lot of good things. about it, so I'm very excited about the possibility of going there." he said.

When he arrived in Chichester last year with eight GCSEs and his guitar slung on his back he admits to being terrified at first.

At Chichester there are more than four thousand people coming in and out every day, so it was quite a shock coming from a quiet place like Stanley to such a busy and hectic environment at college. But I was made to feel very welcome and settled in very quickly," he said.

The study programme is more relaxed than at FICS says Marcus, but the mentality for most Falklands students is that if you don't work, then you won't be coming back next year, so there is no point in slacking.

I enjoy the work I do at Chichester because it is very practical and presents a lot of opportunities. For example, organising and playing a gig was the final major project on my course, and I think that you can learn a great deal from actively doing things like this instead of sitting in a classroom taking notes," says Marcus.

Moving away from home and gaining a sense of independence was an exciting prospect for him.

"As well as learning about our subjects. I think that we also learn a lot about life in general. You get to meet a lot of people from all over the world and learn about different cultures and ways of life. I have met Russians, Greeks. Germans, Chinese, Dutch, Spaniards, Belgians, Africans and Americans at college, and I think that it makes you realise how diverse the world is.

So, what do students miss most when they leave the Falklands?

"Obviously I missed my friends a lot, but at times I also missed the way of life here at home."

Although there are some similarities between the lifestyles, for himself he has found that young people in England rely more on clubs and cinemas and shops to have fun and spend

time with their friends, whereas young people in the Falklands make their own fun and are more creative with what they do. Homesickness is inevitable but

there is an antidote: "When we got homesick at college we just used to stick on some country music and dance around a bit! After a bit of Creedence, some Alan Jackson and a quick samba it was like being home again." says Marcus, proving that old Falklands traditions live on in our youth

To celebrate arriving back in the Islands Marcus says he asked everyone to get some parties going. "The best thing about coming back is just seeing everyone again, so it was nice to get everyone together and have a good time," he said

For Marcus the green fields of England haven 1 got a patch on the rolling hills of the Falklands. The one thing he would like to take from the Falklands is the landscape.

"The scenery in England gets very boring, and one of the things that strikes me when I come home is the landscape, so it would be great to take that with me.

Nadia Smith is at Peter Symonds. College, which this year is celebrating its 400th anniversary of foundation She is studying Travel and Tourism Media and History, she was also 16 when she arrived at college. Her first day was one she says she definitely won't forget: "Due to delays with the air bridge we arrived four days late. missing out on the team building activities and welcome games. This made my first day a little uncomfortable as everyone had begun to make friends. but despite this everyone was very welcoming and decided a shopping trip into Southampton would be the best way for us all to bond. It worked?" she said

Nadia found the transition from FICS to college quite straight forward with the biggest difference being the step-up in the work-load "With the increased work-load also comes much more independence." she says. "Teachers do not chase you for work

but you are expected to take control but you are supported to take control of your study time and complete the of your study time and complete the necessary work in time." she explained.

For Nadia the most exciting thing is the new experiences she faces on a is the new capetion cos and faces on a daily basis: meeting new people, trydaily basis, including to revealing to new

"After my first year at college I places. now find that 1 am much more independent and I think living in the UK away from your parents can give you some important life experiences.

For me there was nothing more frightening than sitting in a classroom with 20 complete strangers and having to stand up and tell them about myself: after this ordeal you are almost ready to face anything," she says. Inevitably friends and family are

missed. The friendly atmosphere and way of life in the Falklands is such a part of the students life that they find themselves falling into the Islander's habit of searching the crowds for a familiar face.

"Many times I found myself wandering about Sainsbury's wondering where all the friendly faces were or when walking down the street why people weren't giving a quick wave as they drove on past." Nadia recalled. The year is split up into three

terms and the students get home for a short break at Christmas, they can return at Easter but have to fund the flight themselves and then again for the long summer holidays.

'As the end of term loomed I would be getting very excited at the prospect of coming home. For me the

thing I was looking forward to most was seeing everyone again and catching up with what had been happening while I had been away, also a good party with some dancing of course."

So, if Nadia could take one thing from the Falklands to college with her, what would it be, There is no hesitation in her re-

ply: "The freedom we have here. which some people take for granted. Living in a busy city in the UK I can sometimes feel claustrophobic and all I want to do is go out for a drive into Camp or go for a wander down the beach

However if she could reverse the option it would have to be the shopping. "I'm a typical girl. I love to go shopping and probably spend far too much money on doing so," she said.

Nadia has not decided what direction exactly she is going to head in career wise but has started the process of applying for a university place, During the last year I have had

numerous ideas about my future career all of which I have discarded and replaced with a new one before the week is out. I am planning though on spending some serious time while I am home to investigate some possible career choices and also to decide which course I plan to study at University," she said.

While the idea of going to col lege can be daunting for the student and positively terrifying for the parents, one year into her further education Nadia says it is "...most definitely the best thing I have done so far."





# Planning and building update By Graham France CHAIRED by Councillor Richard

Davies, the meeting began with a word of thanks from him to Andrea the Environmental Wright. Planning Officer (EPO), for her excellent production of the planning Workshop last month which was attended by members and councillors.

Before considering new applications for planning permission the EPO gave an update on the proposed extraction of calcified seaweed at Pond Valley. Spring Point Farm on West Falkland, also four planning appeals, which had been or were to be considered by Executive Council (ExCo). One of those appeals was for the erection of a dwelling on land west of Beaver Hangar off Moody Brook Road and members were advised that ExCo were minded to allow the appeal and grant approval but had requested the EPO to suggest appropriate conditions

The committee then looked at a number of applications for the renewal of temporary consents and granted the following, some with and some without conditions: the siting of a storage container at Stanley Golf Club on Moody Brook Road: also at Stanley Golf Club. a container with a lean-to roof; a Portakabin on Lookout Industrial Estate for Ian Bury: the mussel farm sited between Goose Green and Darwin for Falklands Fresh Limited: the use of the Tabernacle Church on Barrack Street as a children's nursery for Rugrats; and the siting of a Portakabin for the Education Department in Stanley House Grounds.

An application to keep sited the Portakabin located at 3 Brandon Road West by Peter McKay was deferred to allow the EPO to discuss its possible relocation to his site at Kiel Canal Road.

Chris May's proposal to erect dog cages on land south of Lookout Rocks had been deferred at the meeting held in July, but in view of further information provided by the applicant, that the dogs would only be present for one month in the year and that the kennels would be south-facing, it was decided to grant New applications

The following applications re-ceived conditional planning permission: FIDC's proposal to install a one kilowatt wind turbine at Moody Brook Aquaculture Site; Robert French's proposals to install a temporary container for storage and that of he and his wife Breda's scheme to crect a single storey dwelling and double garage with workshop at 12 Narrows View; the extensions to her dwelling at 10 Beaver Road for Arlene Bowers; the erection of a one-and-half storey house at 28 Ross Road West for Tyson and Gina Smith: a single storey house at 2 Gleadell Close for Terrianne Ormond: and the installation of a second satellite earth station (6.3m antenna) for Cable and Wireless at their Earth Station on Darwin Road.

One application was refused consent and that was Donna May's outline proposal to crect a dwelling on land at 3 Drury Street, having a frontage to Pioneer Row. The proposal attracted some discussion over the impact such a new-build would have on this historic part of Stanley, also the difficulty in providing offstreet parking given the narrowness of Pioneer Row

Only one application was deferred: Donna Triggs' proposal in principle for the crection of a house on land west of the caravan site at Murray Heights on the south side of the Bypass. It was decided that the whole area should first be considered on a comprehensive basis in order that proper infrastructure is provided to serve it, and that the EPO should discuss this with the Director of Public Works

Members then reviewed a list of applications for Building Permits considered by the Building Adviser and noted that of the four listed, three were to be approved

At the conclusion of Part I of the meeting, which lasted exactly one hour and was attended by four members of the public including the writer, it was agreed that the next would be held on Thursday Sep-tember 6, commencing at 8.30am in the Liberation Room of the Secretariat

Supplies destined for Stanley shops are still in Punta Arenas waiting

to be picked up. At Beauchene, Colleen Loftus said they could have lost as much as a month's trading.

A move that has further angered those in the retail, catering and hotel trades is that they have received letters from the Performing Rights Society in London telling them they must pay for the privilege of having music playing in their premises. Fox Bay Social Club as an example has a membership of 17 and has been asked for £158 and Shirley Knight is not amused. "It's a nonsense and a lot of money to find," she said.

Mrs Jessie Booth of Stanley is presented with her Member of the British Empire medal at Government House. Mrs Booth is the senior JP and was awarded her MBE for outstanding service to the community, in particular for her work as a magistrate over many years.

#### Eleven years ago, August 14, 1996

LOCAL fishing company Consolidated Fisheries Limited (CFL) boost the government's coffers by £576986 as they pay their first tax bill. The company are considering the purchase of a fishing vessel and are hopeful of raising the necessary extra capital locally by widening their shareholding within the Falkland Islands.

A new government department is tucked away in the dock yard in the form of the Geology section. It holds two full time members. Dr Don Aldiss, seconded from the British Geological Survey in Keyworth Nottingham and Emma Edwards who graduated from Queen's University in Belfast in June 1995.

Sailor Mike Hughes returns with his wife Kirsten and two children with plans to establish a seaman's mission in Stanley. Their plans have recently been boosted by government approval of funds to construct or buy a suitable building. The sea still calls for Mike who is soon setting off to Punta Arenas to deliver the *Foam* to her new owners.

At a meeting of the Sheep Owners Association and the Falkland Islands General Employees Union a 7% pay increase is agreed to boost all scales. Taken together with the Government's intention to abolish OAP contributions made by employees, this equates to the 12% increase the GEU were looking for.

Seven years ago, August 4, 2000 A GOLDEN Touz:/Falklands Fresh project could turn our sheep farmers into fishermen. Fishing Company Golden Touza hope to have a £200,000 fish processing plant up and running by the end of September. The plant will then be leased to Falklands Fresh and that company will be looking to farmers to catch local fish with mullet and crab intended to be the primary product.

The Queen Mother celebrates her 100th birthday and in the Falklands the Governor holds a tea party for Senior Citizens at Government House.

Speaking after a Hydrocarbons Commission meeting in London, Director of Mineral Resources Phyl Rendell says the British and Argen-tine delegations hope to "...intensify cooperation," in terms of joint scientific research. The Argentine delegation suggested they should all go away and, "relect further."

Argentine Congress pass a fisheries law similar to the FIGs high seas ordinance. Argentine flagged vessels wishing to fish in the high seas will now be subject to the same conservation rules that affect Falklands flagged vessels.

#### Mount Pleasant Airfield weather summary for July

JULY was a month when at Mount Pleasant there were more days of snow recorded since 1986 when the airport was opened.

There were also below average temperatures, hours of sunshine and rainfall.

The mean maximum temperature for July was 3.1 C, below the long term average of 4.5 C. The highest temperature recorded was 10.8 C on the 29th and the lowest maximum was -0.8 C on the 10th. The mean minimum temperature was -0.7 C below the long term av-erage of 0.1 C. The lowest minimum was -60 C on the 27th and the highest minimum of 4.4 C was recorded on the 29th.

Rainfall was below average for the month, with a total of 43.1 mm against the normal for July of 45.7 mm. The wettest day was the 20th

with 5.2 mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 26 days and 1.0mm or more on 14 days.

There were 26 days when snow or sleet fell and one day when hail was reported. No days of thunder and eleven days with fog were reported

There was 58.9 hours of sunshine, below the average of 65.8 hours. The highest daily total was 6.1 hours on the 25th. There were nine days when no sunshine was recorded

The monthly mean wind speed was 12.7 knots, slightly below av-erage for the month. The highest hourly mean speed of 30 knots oc-curred on the 26th and the highest gust of 47 knots occurred on the 26th. There were 12 days with gusts over 33 knots, which is below average and one day of gales was recorded on the 26th

#### Your questions answered

Q Several months ago we heard that the factory supplying the Falklands with Chilean chicken had burnt down. Since that time up until now, there has been very little (if any) Chilean chicken available here.

Surely the chickens will have been killed and processed elsewhere in Chile?

Is there some difficulty with meat certification? Is it likely that there will be Chilean chicken back in the shops shortly?

General Manager of the Falkland Islands Company Ltd, Roger Spink provided the following information.

A When the factory was burned

down we where told that there are other EU certified plants in Chile. we tried all these plants, but the demand on these plants was so great because of the increase of business due to the fire, that they were unable to fulfil our orders. We were given dates by our suppliers of originally March and now August 2007, that the Super Pollo factory will be opened again. We have an email to say that Chilean chicken will be available on the next voyage on August 16. Meanwhile we have ordered sufficient stocks of UK chicken to ensure our customers at the West Store suffer the minimum of inconvenience.

Seafish Chandlery have also confirmed that they are expecting stocks of chicken from Chile later this month.

#### Wool market report for week ending August 3, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices fell alarmingly at sales in Australia during the week ending Friday August 3.

As shown in the attached micron "Price Guide Table" falls were between 16 and 34 pence per kilogram clean for individual micron categories.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down approximately 30 p/kg clean at 367.2 p/kg clean compared to the previous weeks closing level of 397.0 pence per kilogram clean.

Confusion over the status of wool import quotas to China caused reduced wool buying interest in Australian markets during the week. This factor combined with currency relativity changes had a negative "double hit" on wool prices for Falkland Islands farmers.

Serious wool price falls were recorded as soon as markets opened on Tuesday; however prices stabilized during trading late in the week with marginal gains posted on Wednesday and Thursday.

In Australia 77% of the 52,949 bales presented to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 6,811 bales of crossbred wool of which 75% were sold. Next week approximately 50,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in Australia and New Zealand. Note:





# Ferry workshops highlight 'unknowns'

THERE is still much to be ironed out about how the new coastal shipping service and the consolidation of its cargo will operate, it was revealed at a series of workshops hosted by the Development Corporation (FIDC) over the past fortnight.

The meetings were aimed at helping people to understand how the ferry may operate and to see how they can make the most out of the new service. Based at Newhaven, the new vessel. *Concordia Bay*, will be committed to providing a cross-sound ferry service every weekend and a delivery service to the islands throughout the week.

A workshop held in Stanley on Tuesday evening was the third in the series, with earlier meetings in Fox Bay and Hill Cove. Manager of FIDC, Mark Brunet, opened the workshop saying it was a chance to, "...share things we know and things we don't know," the latter causing some visible frustration among those present.

A number were keen to know as soon as possible what freight rates the government would be setting for the ferry service; without this information, they said, people who might be interested in providing consolidation and delivery services could not work on their pricing structures. Karen Lee summed up the feeling: "You need to know what costs will be involved if you are working out if a viable business can be run. It is a entical factor."

Councillor Mike Summers felt this was not necessarily the case and that prospective service providers could be, "...working on costings now" without waiting for the government's rates to be announced. However, he added that the pricing scale is due to be presented to Executive Council in September

Mr Brunet said the outer islands should be no worse off under the new service, however Rob McGill of Carcass Island disagreed. He described the link to West Falkland as "great" but felt the service to the islands would be much worse than that currently provided by the *Tamar*.

Mr Brunet later acknowledged that the Islands present, "...a particular challenge," but added, "...the possibility is there that, as we get to understand better how the ship works, we might be able to improve things. But it would foolish to make promises at this stage."

# Foot and Mouth: caution continues

THE Falklands will still be able to import goods from the UK, despite the Foot and Mouth outbreak in the south of England.

Limited restrictions have been placed on the import of goods from the United Kingdom but the EU has introduced legislation which provides that certain products derived from animals can be exported from Great Britain (England, Scotland and Wales) despite the outbreak

The Falkland Islands is not part of the European Union (EU), however in most cases we mirror EU import regulations aimed at controlling animal disease and a declaration has been made so the Falklands can act as if it were another EU country

This legislation will be reviewed and updated on August 23 by the Commission of the EU

The Director of Agriculture intends to permit the import from the UK to the Falklands of certain products derived from animals, as if the Falkland Islands were a member of the EU (other than the United Kingdom).

Senior Veterinary Officer. Vic Epstein, said the legislation simplifies matters, "...so that the importers and exporters can get good advice from DEFRA and the correct documentation can accompany the imports to the Falklands." He reminded importers that correct documentation will be required or goods will be held in bond.

As for passengers arriving by aircraft into the Islands, Dr Epstein said foot bathing will continue for passengers from the UK for a while,

"but maybe only those who have been living/visiting south of London will have the shoes in their baggage examined."

#### Quake rocks Peru

A POWERFUL 8 magnitude earthquake has hit the coast of Peru, killing at least 450 people and injuring hundreds more.

Most of the deaths were in the coastal province of Ica, about 165 miles south of Lina.

Jennie Forrest of International Tours and Travel Ltd said her company currently has nine clients in Peru, however news reports have not mentioned the major tourist areas.

Telephone lines are reported to have been damaged in the quake and, unsurprisingly, Mrs Forrest said she had not yet received any information from her Peruvian operator about which areas have been alfected and what effect this will have on travellers.

RETURNING to the Islands aboard the Lan flight at the weekend I had sensibly packed all my shoes in the same bag, ready to be washed of any sneaky Foot and Mouth germs. The day before I'd read on *PN* online (www.penguin-news.com)

about the new safety measures which followed the contained outbreak in the UK and I was more than happy to walk through a foot bath and, if necessary, bring out all my footwear for inspection (which I thought I'd be required to do, but in the end wasn't) following the Senior Vet's appeal for vigilance. However, I did - and still do - wonder why this isn't a permanent requirement for people arriving on the Lan flight.

Chile is a Foot and Mouth-free country but its neighbours are not and passengers are surely just as likely to have touched down in places such as Brazil, Peru and Argentina as they are the UK when using the Lan link. So why is it only following the contained outbreak in the UK that we introduce these safety measures? It seems a bit of a halfhearted approach to preventing contamination.

I realise the threat from these South American countries may not be deemed as high as that from the UK but I would be happier to see a permanent prudent approach - ie foot baths for everyone arriving on the Lan flight to pass through.

Passengers arriving at MPA are reminded through declaration forms and big, shiny new posters that the Islands have an environment that needs protecting. Surely this need always exists - not just when the UK has a scare?

Or am I just being paranoid?

SHARON JAFFRAY was thrown in at the deep end last month when I had to rush away to Chile with my husband. Thanks to everyone who offered help to the PN team in my unexpected absence.

After more than five weeks away it is good to be home but on the work front all seems to be a bit quiet. Even at the meeting on the new coastal shipping service, which was promisingly full of people frus-trated by the number of 'unknowns' we are still facing, any chance of an outburst (which we journos really do live for) were dampened down by Mr Brunet's holding up of hands and promising to find out all he could within the month.



Abattoir manager, John Ferguson, felt the establishment of a users group could be beneficial - "there are a whole load of questions with no answers" - but Mr Brunet was concerned people most interested in the service, such as residents on West Falkland and the outer islands, would not be able to attend meetings of such a group.

He asked the gathering what the remit of a users group should be, if it were to be established. Mrs Lee felt it should, "Make sure the flow of information is going to and from the right people.

Looking back on the three workshops, Mr Brunet said they

had been "constructive" and, "...highlighted some things we hadn't thought about."

Commenting on Falklands Radio on the number of 'unknowns' which exist, he said it was better to admit to these areas: "It is healthy to have engagement with people now, because they will help us to make sure that the service does develop in a way which is the best it possibly could be."

In an effort to provide regular information on the service, a circular email list is to be established by FIDC. Anyone wishing to be included on this list can email Tim Cotter on tcotter@fidc.co.fk. The next update will be out by September 13.

#### Veterans badge extended to 1982 FIDF volunteers

THE men from the Falkland Islands Defence Force who reported for active duty in Stanley on April 1 1982, are to receive Veterans Lapel Badges from the British Government.

His Excellency The Governor of the Falkland Islands, Mr Alan Huckle, will make presentations to the veterans on behalf of the Under Secretary of State for Service Personnel and Veterans of the Armed Forces of the United Kingdom.

Jock Elliot, Secretary of the South Atlantic Medal Association has written to the Veterans Minister to thank him for the gesture.

He commented, "I believe I speak for many ex-veterans of the British Forces when I say that this is a great recognition of the Falkland Islands Defence Force, all men from the community of whom we should all be proud turned to in order to defend their Islands...'

# Government ordered to pay SAMS' costs

DESPITE its win, the government has been instructed to pay the costs of an appeal by South Atlantic Marine Services Ltd (SAMS), following its failure to disclose relevant information during the hearing.

As reported in *Penguin News* last week, Chief Justice Mr Christopher Gardner QC found in favour of the government in the appeal, however his ruling on costs showed a level of sympathy with the fishing company.

SAMS began its application to review the Director of Fisheries' decision not to take into account the sinking of one of its ships, and thus the decision not to award it more ITQ, on February 13.

A preliminary ruling by the Fisheries Disputes Commission, concerning its powers of review, was appealed by SAMS on May 2, which included the question of whether the Director had any discretion to take into account other factors, other than the criteria set out by Executive Council.

Section 4(5) of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 2005 states that the Director shall act in accordance with any direction that the Governor, "acting in his discretion," may give to him. SAMS counsel, Richard Marlor of Kilmartin Marlor Legal Practitioners, told Penguin News this meant that, if a direction had been issued by the Governor to the Director of Fisheries not to take into account the sinking of one of SAMS' vessels and so not to award SAMS any additional ITQ, "...it is quite clear that the Director would have had no discretion and this could not be challenged before the Commission or on appeal to the Supreme Court."

However, at no stage between the commencement of the review back in February and the final day of the appeal hearing, on July 4, had the matter of the Governor issuing a direction to the Director been raised by the Falkland Islands Government.

On the first day of the appeal before the Supreme Court, the Chief Justice specifically asked the Attorney General whether it was being alleged that the Governor had issued a direction to the Director, and he stated that this was not being alleged.

However, the following day email correspondence between the Governor, various councillors and the Director of Fisheries was disclosed to SAMS' lawyers by the government, alleging this very same thing.

Had SAMS been made aware of the existence of this direction, Mr Marlor said, his client would not have taken the decision to ask for a review of the decision by the Director of Fisheries before the Commission and then to appeal the Commission's ruling to the Supreme Court. "Instead, leave would have been sought from the very beginning to judicially review the decision of the Governor to issue the direction that he gave to the Director."

He added. "A judicial review of the Director's decision was applied for at the same time as SAMS appealed the ruling of the Commission, but the Chief Justice, quite properly at that stage, stayed this application until all other remedies had been exhausted.

"However, due to failure of the government to disclose the direction of the Governor, the appeal, once the direction had been disclosed, was bound to fail and so there was, in fact, no other remedy."

The failure to disclose this information lead the judge, Chief Justice Gardner, to order that the costs of SAMS' appeal - in the region of £8.000 - be met by the government.

As a result of the failure by the government to disclose the relevant material, SAMS has incurred costs over the past six months which have been effectively wasted, Mr Marlor said.

said. "The ruling by the Chief Justice, to order the government to pay SAMS' costs of the appeal, only goes some way to compensating SAMS but, unfortunately, there is no power to order the government to pay the wasted costs before the Commission."

#### Judicial Review

The story is by no means over, however. SAMS has now taken the

option of judicially reviewing the Governor in Executive Council's decision not to take the sinking into account, saying it was unreasonable or improper.

Mr Marlor says it is likely that it will now take another three months before SAMS' application for judicial review can be heard. He commented, "Had the government acted properly in this case and disclosed relevant material at the proper time, it is almost certain that this matter would have been concluded by now. As it is, the fisheries that SAMS is involved in, and the other companies granted ITQ in those fisheries, will still be in a state of uncertainty over what the eventual outcome of this case will be and what their eventual amount of ITQ might be."

He added, "It should also be remembered that it is the Falklands taxpayers who have to pay the costs of the government's failure to act in time and in a proper manner."

And it looks likely to take some time. On Wednesday morning the government applied to the Chief Justice to have the possible hearing date of the judicial review put back even further.

Reacting to the news, Mr Marlor commented, "The reasons that the government gives for this is that SAMS has not yet filed its application with the government, even though the government's lawyers are well aware that SAMS has 14 days to do so and that only six of those 14 days have elapsed. Further, the government puts forward that the Governor's likely absence from the Islands for a month or so may affect his ability to provide a statement in this case. However, in this day and age, with instant worldwide communication, SAMS finds this a very strange argument to put forward. SAMS intends to oppose the government's applications

the Governor's response Additionally, SAMS and its legal team has complained to the Attorney General that the Governor, "...the person whose decision-making is being called into question," has become involved in the cost of the flight to bring the Chief Justice to the Islands to hear the case.

Mr Marlor told *Penguin News*, "The Governor's involvement has had the potential effect of putting back the possible hearing date, just at the moment when the government is applying to the Supreme Court for exactly the same thing. This may amount to an abuse of power by the Governor and we have contacted the Attorney General's Chambers to express our concerns over this."

Yesterday, His Excellency the Governor, Mr Alan Huckle, disputed Mr Marlor's suggestion that he had - either directly or indirectly sought to delay the date of the judicial review of the SAMS decision. He commented, "My involvement has been limited to indicating to the Courts Administrator that the Chief Justice should use the airbridge rather than fly, as he had proposed, from Canada where he would be attending a conference in November. This would have cost several thousand pounds more than a flight by the

airbridge. "The Courts Administrator actually suggested advancing the review to late October but 1 understand that this proved difficult for the Chief Justice."

Mr Huckle said the scheduling of court cases is, "...entirely a matter for the court," and added, "it is not my intention to become involved in that process." However he added, "...the administration of the court is subject to the usual FIG budgetary procedures and it is surely right that the normal arrangements for travel to the Falklands should be established at the outset of the Chief Justice's term of office."

Dave Eynon, a director of SAMS, stated that he was "extremely annoyed" over the way that, "...this entire case has been incompetently handled by the government."

He added that he was also surprised at the Governor's, "...seemingly limitless power to control the fishing industry." This was something he felt had not been "adequately grasped" by those involved in the fishing industry and is something that he intends raising with them.

#### Mrs Kirchner aims to be 'presidenta'

SENATOR Cristina Fernández de Kirchner is now well underway in her campaign for the Argentine presidency. If elected, she will succeed her husband, Nestor Kirchner.

Cheered at a rally in Buenos Aires this week by a crowd who sang her name "Cristina presidente", the First Lady corrected the audience saying it was time to get used to the Spanish gender of president: "presidenta".

Approval ratings for Kirchner's administration have been buoyed by years of robust economic growth following Argentina's 2002 financial meltdown. But his popularity has dipped in recent months amid high inflation, energy crisis and corruption scandals.

With incumbents barred from seeking more than one consecutive re-election, some have speculated that Kirchner and his wife plan to alternate in power.

However, Tuesday night's rally was held under the shadow of the latest alleged corruption scandal involving a Venezuelan businessman who last weekend tried to bring into Argentina a suitcase stuffed with USS800,000 in a jet chartered by Argentina's energy company officials. The incident cost the job of the right hand man of Federal Planning minister Julio De Vido, one of Kirchner's closest and most trusted aides.

In July, when Cristina Kirchner's was first launched as political candidate in a political rally under similar circumstances another money scandal overshadowed the event. A bag of cash, almost US\$65,000, was found in the bathroom of Economy minister Felicia Micelli who was forced to resign. MP

A panel consisting of the gov-ernment's Chief Executive Chris Simpkins, Standard Chartered Bank Manager Nick Hutton, former councillor Stephen Luxton and FIC General Manager Roger Spink, have been looking at the issue of pay and what level it could be set at. At the meeting on Tuesday, they explained the reasoning behind their proposals (which were outlined in Penguin News last week). Mr Luxton said they had looked

at other Overseas Territories' payment to Members - Gibraltar in particular - and used that as a baseline, in conjunction with the present daily rate of £105 paid to Falklands councillors when attending meetings

The ball park figure of £20 -£25,000 per annum for a full paid councillor appeared to be an acceptable sum to those at the meeting, although one person commented that the present system seems to work well and if that payment was not considered adequate an adjustment could easily be made.

Under the present system, councillors on average earn £16,064 per annum which is taxable (apart from the basic allowance of £3,477 which is not) and does not include any pension or redundancy payments.

Mr Hutton said that some sort

of "soft landing" needs to be in place in the form of pension and redundancy if councillors were to take a career break in order to devote more time to council work.

Redundancy however, would only be for councillors who were standing for re-election and certain criteria would have to be met in terms of percentage of votes re-ceived, he said, while the pension package would include OAP and RPC which would add 10% on top of the salary. The proposed salary for a councillor who opts for the fully paid position will be taxable.

Mr Hutton said that in making their recommendations they had looked at whether certain portfolios were more demanding than others rather than at the level of work carried out by individual councillors, and none had stood out as being so.

One person at the meeting suggested the full time salary was at a level that would attract the wrong sort of person to stand for council, but this was not supported by others, while Mr Luxton stressed that if people of the right calibre needed for council were to be attracted, it has to be made easier for a wider range of people to stand for election.

He said the suggested level of payment was in line with what Gibraltar pays their ministers but assured there was no intention to move to a ministerial system in the Falklands.

He is attached to 47/LXX (Engineering) Sqn of RAF Lyneham as a participant in Exercise Longlook, a British-Australian military exchange programme.

Giving an Aussie feel to the event, Sergeant Dawson also played Waltzing Matilda as a way of thanking not only John and Kevin for their support but to thank elements of 905 Expeditionary Air Wing based at Mount Pleasant.

He said he is grateful to all who made his request possible including 78 Squadron Heli-tasking, British International and his colleagues on 1312 Flight who made it possible for a perfectly timed Hercules flypast in support of the event.

#### Surprise family reunion for Norman




STANLEY resident Norman Clark received a blast from the past last weekend.

### 'Private sector is subsidising government's blunders'

THE Budget session coincided with the 25th anniversary commemorations this year and there was less comment than usual on the outcome. I would like to share my views on the Budget.

One notable item was the 5% increase in corporation tax on companies. This increase appears to have been a last minute decision by Elected Members in an endeavour to produce a balanced budget. Thus, rather than make cuts in government expenditure Members increased the burden on the private sector

FIG has for a number of years been faced with stagnant if not reducing revenue, and increasing expenditure. Despite this Members seem not only intent on pursuing existing schemes which are a serious drain on our financial resources, such as the abattoir, but also to embark on poorly thought out projects such as the crosssound ferry.

The last Census shows 363 people in Camp of which just 127 live on the West and 42 on other islands. The Islands Plan states that "Camp will remain viable as a well-populated and economically and socially sustainable commu-. The use of the word "renity main" is interesting as it suggests Camp is viable when it has not been economically sustainable for many years, and despite all the millions that have been spent on it the population continues to fall. It appears that our Elected Members put this failure down to not spending enough and that they are determined to spend even more of our dwindling resources on this small sector of the economy.

In the Legislative Council one Member using his best Irish accent compared the situation to the Irishmen who was asked the way to Dublin and said, "I wouldn't start from here." It seems he wants to ignore how we got "here" as though it was by some event outwith anyone's control. Understandable I guess if you are a politician as an analysis would be embarrassing for those who made the decisions in the past which have brought us to where we are.

#### So what is "here"?

Falkland Landholdings. Annual losses have been in the hundreds of thousands of pounds. We are now "selling the silver" by disposing of assets to stem the losses. You can only sell these assets once

The abattoir. The losses are increasing year on year and I am dubious that this project will ever make a profit. The operating subsidy was in excess of £700,000 last year. This is shrugged off with a comment by one Member that it is making a positive contribution to the economy. At that cost I should hope it is! Nevertheless a loss is still a loss. Subsidies are

only any good when there is someone to sign the cheque.

The cross-sound ferry. Only a matter of weeks after the annual budget has been finalised, it is discovered that plant and equipment are required for which there was no provision. That's another £150,000 which had to be taken from the "provisional" sum of £1.7m for the ferry terminals or we would be in deficit territory before the first month of the financial year was up. The ferry has been contracted and yet it still has not been established where the terminals will be.


The Consolidated Fund. Following the implementation of Resource Accounting officials and Members now refer to Net Liquid Assets and the Consolidated Fund is valued at market rates. Thus we are reassured by an official that the Consolidated Fund is at £86.7m representing 2.5 times annual operating expenditure, when the focus should be on the money that is being withdrawn from the Fund (the book cost value dropped by £2.5m last year). In other words our hard won capital is being eroded not only by withdrawals but also by inflation.

The Civil Service. New posts appear as though we are awash with money. We fall over ourselves to respond to rules imposed by outside agencies which are not relevant to the Islands. Unnecessary tasks are the order of the day.

To fund this extravagance Members avoided taking tough decisions to stem the flow of funds to support desirable projects for Camp, instead they have increased it. In easy times desirable projects might be acceptable, in hard times they have to be sacrificed. Members continue to avoid tackling the cost of the Civil Service by threatening reduction in service as the only way out when efficiency gains and cost reductions should be pursued. Why? Because the Civil Service represents a substantial chunk of the voting population? Because it is the Civil Service which produces the Budget?

Instead Members have decided to place a heavier burden on one of the few success stories - the private sector. Yet it is the private sector which is the future for the Islands. It should be encouraged not penalised. And the Financial Secretary has the nerve to refer to a modest increase in taxes with threats of more to come. To expect the private sector to subsidise government's blunders and poor planning might work in the short term but it won't be sustainable for long and then we'll end up with nothing.

Elected Members need to take a hard look at government expenditure and they need to do it now. Mike Forrest, Stanley



# Where in the world ?

ISLANDER Petula Clarke (48), has an adventurous spirit and even ran a farm on West Falkland single-handedly for a year before moving to Stanley in the mid 1990s. From hairdresser to Cruise Director with Clipper Cruise Lines and then to Hotel Manager with Quark Expeditions, this week she shares some of her around-the-world experiences of life on the ocean wave.

I THINK we have all had wandering thoughts in our heads at some stage in our lives, a point when we have sat down and asked, "...is this it, or is there more?"

1999 was a significant year for met. I had decided 1 would like to work at sea but had no idea as to how 1 would achieve it or indeed whether 1 could take myself out or my comfort zone and away from family and friends. All 1 knew was that I needed to do something more with my life - the question was, what and how? It wasn't a case of 'the glass is greener, but trying to find something new and fulfilling in my life and work.

I began by writing to cruise line agencies and chatting to different people about my plans/dreams, just trying to find a way in the door. Out of the blue came a phone call asking me if I was interested in meeting a hotel director currently travelling on a cruise ship docked at FIPASS. They needed a hairdresser/gift shop manager. It seemed my door had opened and it was thanks to Taff Davres.

By January 2000 I was on a ship heading for Antarctica. I will never forget those first four months at sea, missing family and home, waking up in the middle of the night feeling claustrophobic because of the air-conditioning. How I missed my children, the wide open spaces and the good, clean fresh air of home.

I will never forget the concerned and caring attitude of the Philippine crew. They wondered why this Falkland Island woman was always outside for air during the night and finding it difficult to become accustomed to the det change. They are separated from their families for seven or eight months every year, and my short time on board didn't compare in anyway. Feeling sorry for myself was not the answer. I decided. The crew and I often laughed about those times in later years.

Later that year I was offered the position of Assistant Hotel Manager, moving between two ships traveling world-wide. I knew I was lucky and 1 was definitely up for the challenge. I stayed in this position for two years and then moved up to take the Cruise Director role. It was with this promotion that I realised I had to conquer one of my worst fears, speaking in public. I will never forget my first speech in front of more than 100 people: it was nerve racking and demanded every ounce of my inner strength but it was such a fantastic opportunity and so totally what I wanted to do. I stayed in this position for two years

By this time I had experienced four very demanding years. I had worked my way around seven continents from Russia to Vietnam and down to the South Pacific and from my experiences I have gained no end of knowledge and a deeper understanding of very remote places, where people really do have nothing.



The world has become a smaller place for me but still I look around and think, "...this is just like on television," and in some of the less lucrative parts of the world, "...people really do still live this way."

In mrd-2004 1 chose to take some rest time and think about what I wanted to do next: I knew it would be on cruise ships but I wanted to go in a slightly different direction. This was when I moved to my present company. Quark Expeditions, travelling to the ice regions.

By late 2004 I was on my way to Antarctica. I have completed three seasons in Antarctica and one in the Arctic. My work takes me home every year, and I get to travel to beautiful Antarctica and talk about the Falklands. What could be better?

So many passengers come on our trips without having visited the Falklands before: we have become a much more sought after destination. I have often hear myself saying. 'If you have only visited Stanley you have seen nothing yet, take the time to go outside of town too.'' I hope I have played some part in building a picture of life in the Falklands in the minds of those that get to spend only a short time in the Islands and I will continue to do so

I now base myself in New Zealand, I have a sister and her family here, both of my daughters and I have three adorable grandchildren. You could say I have the best of both worlds. I get to spend my time ashore with my family here and during my visits home I get to spend time with my son and family.

I do miss home, my family and my friends at times but I love basing myself in New Zealand and with my work I can see all my families all over the world.

I feel most fortunate in having the opportunity to take people to parts of the world that are still considered to be wild, where traditional practices still exist and history is still being discovered. The beauty of the places I visit is not wasted on me, I often sit and think, "...how lucky am 1?"

So, if you have that niggling thought that there is something else out there for you that could make your life more fulfilling, follow your dream - I did and it has taken me all around the world!



"The ship had been chartered by an Australian company, it was entire families, hence my Zodiae full of kids. We spotted the pod of Orea whilst repositioning down south and dropped the Zodiaes really quickly. We thought there had to be about 40 in the pod, they were very interested in us, kept shooting under the Zodiaes, following our engines and a couple of times spy hopping and making eye contact with me. An absolutely amazing experience, the staff onboard called them "Tula's pod' because a large male came up to my zodiac with a dead penguin on his head and pushed it up the side of the zodiac to me - he was giving me a gift! He dropped it once but came back and did it again...1 didn't take it."

9. What's one thing about you that people would be surprised to learn? I hate the sound of my own voice.







WHILST we all pride ourselves on the clean, unpolluted surrounding that the Falklands provides, sadly a common sight now is the marine rubbish that turns pristine sands into a scattered playground of plastic and ropes

Marine debris is particular damaging to the environment as it poses a constant threat to seabirds and mammals. In an effort to combat this problem, and analyse where and from what source the debris is stemming, Falkland Conservation is running a litter survey on the weekend of September 1. The survey is being held in conjunction with another similar survey taking place in Patagonia.

The results of these two surveys should give us a clear picture of just how much rubbish is coming in from our own economic zone and

from abroad," explained Anna Shepherd of Falklands Conservation (FC).

The FC Watch Group will be participating in this event, however we would greatly appreciate volun-teers both around Stanley, and out in Camp who would be willing to donate their time and effort to sup-port this survey," she said.

Volunteers will be asked to walk a preset length of beach and classify litter in simple categories, as well as give a rough estimate of quantity. If possible, collections will be organised for disposal, however this will depend on the numbers of people willing to participate.

WILLIAM Kenneth Porter was born on December 28, 1954 and died on May 17, 2007.

Bill, as he was known, spent the first 20 years of his life with his parents, Joan and George Porter and his sisters Caroline, Marlane and Deirdre at Fox Bay East on West Falkland. He was educated in Camp and when he left school at 14 he worked on the farm, first as a navvy and than as a tractor driver.

His father was the farm mechanic for many years and from an early age Bill developed an interest in vehicles, firstly motorbikes and then a lifelong love of Land Rovers and cars. He'd drive them, occasionally crash them and then put them back together again!

His love affair with JCBs, bulldozers and any amount of other heavy plant, however, began when he left the farm in 1975 and went to Stanley to work for Johnston Construction, a firm of contractors who were employed to build the first airstrip when Argentina operated the air bridge in and out of the Islands.

Bill learned all there was to know about heavy goods vehicles: How they worked, how to drive them, how to take them to pieces, how to mend them and how to put them back together again; although he never had any formal training he became a very skilled mechanic on all sorts of engines and a very skilled operator 100

After the airstrip was built Bill decided to take to the sea and worked on the MV Forrest for a while when she was employed in survey work around the Islands

It was soon back to HGVs again when he took up employment with the government Public Works Department at the quarry and on the construction of the first Camp road, which had reached beyond Pony's Pass by the time the Argentines invaded. Bill was the foreman on the road gang at this time.

He knew they would commandeer all government vehicles as soon as they took charge, so he painted one of the PWD Land Rovers green before they could get their hands on it and used it throughout the conflict to deliver goods to people in the Camp. He took no notice of the curfew that was in place and did most of his deliveries at night or weekends. He also took no notice of the order to hand in guns and kept his hidden in his Rover to enable him to supplement family and friends diets in Stanley with a few geese at times.

Many people on the East had reason to be grateful to Bill and his friends during that time

After the conflict Bill continued to work for PWD and to live with his sister Caroline and her family in Stanley until he returned to Fox Bay in 1988. He lived firstly with his sister Deirdre and her family at Fox Bay West and then in his own house at Fox Bay Village.

His return to the West was in time to play a big hand in the construction of the road between the two Fox Bay settlements and then the construction of the PWD main road network on the West Island.

He also constructed both the



Saunders Island airstrip and the airstrip at Fox Bay.

Although he was dragnosed with a particularly stressful type of cancer Bill continued to live life to the full for as long as he possibly could. He loved messing about in boats and before he died he fulfilled one of his great ambitions - to go off in his little boat and circumnavigate most of the West Islands with Chris Lloyd as his 'mate.

Despite all the trials and tribulations of his illness. Bill faced everything he had to bear with tremendous courage and never lost his sense of humour. Right to the end he still had a twinkle in his eye and still took an interest in the local news.

For as long as he possibly could he kept on building roads. The last road he worked on was the one to Port Edgar and the final job he did was to choose the stone to place at the end of the road for a plaque to be attached recording the building of the road and also the opening by Governor Huckle,

I have only touched on a few aspects of Bill Porters life. He packed a lot into his 52 years and did countless favours for people along the way

He was generous to a fault, and if he liked you, and you wanted it, he would have given you the shirt off his back. He liked to dice for sweepstake tickets and he would suddenly surprise the children of the family with some money that he'd won for them with tickets he'd secretly bought. He was just as generous to the older members of his family too.

Bill was very close to his sisters and took delight in all his nieces and nephews and recently in all the great nieces and nephews too, and they of course loved their Uncle Bill.

He was very much respected by people who worked with him over the years and of course by his friends, which was evident by the attendance at his funeral service. The Tabernacle was packed and the churchyard too. He is very much missed, not only by his mother and all the family, but by the many friends he made throughout his life which was tragically cut short.

He was a man with a big heart who has left his mark in many ways in the Falklands. Not least in the change in the landscape through his part in the progress of the roads, especially on the West.

Q Research in the UK has shown that there is a huge gap between advertised broadband speeds and the actual speeds users can achieve.

A survey by consumer group Which? found that broadband packages promising speeds of up to 8Mbps (megabits per second) actually achieved far less.

Tests of 300 customers' net connections revealed that the average download speed they were getting was 2.7Mbps.

What are the Cable and Wireless download speeds?

**A** Justin McPhee, Cable and Wireless Networks Manager, kindly provided this response.

The current broadband line speeds that Cable and Wireless advertise are the line speeds they actually deliver to customers. There can be problems with quality of the copper cable network and distance from the local exchange as the question indicates.

In Stanley the majority of the

copper cable was installed in 1988/89 which is very much newer than most of the UK network and in Stanley virtually all customers live less than three kilometres from the telephone exchange.

Actual internet download speeds will depend on many factors. Data downloaded in the Falklands such as email will be downloaded at the speeds we advertise while "off island" download speeds will vary depending on the time of day, amount of users accessing the server you are downloading data from and the size of connection of that server.

Internet services to the Falklands are provided via satellite which introduces additional delay and restricts the availability of bandwidth.

Cable and Wireless has invested in acceleration technology to help mitigate some of the problems associated with satellite systems that are not a problem for countries connected via fibre optic cables.

#### Wool market report for week ending August 10, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices increased substantially at sales in Australia and New Zealand last week.

Price increases generally recaptured between 30 and 50 % of the previous week's falls.

As shown in the attached micron "Price Guide Table" price increases were between 6 and 21 pence per kilogram clean for individual micron categories.

vidual micron categories. The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up approximately 13 p/kg clean at 380.8 p/kg clean compared to the previous weeks closing level of 367.2 pence per kilogram clean.

Diminished wool supply, confusion over Chinese import quotas and currency volatility remain as key factors affecting the wool market at the moment.

In Australia 92% of the small offering of 35.166 bales changed hands. Included in the sale were 3.942 bales of crossbred wool of which 87% were sold.

Next week approximately 48,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in Australia and New Zealand. Note:

# Cherie takes first Status pledge

THE first ceremony for the granting of Falkland Islands Status has been held in Stanley

On Friday, August 17, St Helenian-born Cherie Clifford, in the company of family and friends, made and signed the Status Pledge and received her Certificate of Falkland Islands Status from His Excellency the Governor.

The Honourable Janet Robertson, councillor for immigration, made a short speech in which she congratulated Mrs Clifford on the grant of Status, considered to be of "great significance" as it is the closest thing to "citizenship" that the Falkland Islands can grant to immigrants.

Champagne and soft drinks were then served and the Governor proposed a toast to, "Her Majesty the Queen and the Falkland Islands."

Status Ceremonies, lasting one hour, will normally take place within one month of approval of an application.

The fee for the ceremony is paid by the applicant together with, and in addition to, their Status application fee.

The introduction of the ceremonies was recently agreed by Executive Council and the final amendments to the Falkland Islands Status Ordinance were passed by Legislative Council in May 2007.

Under the new arrangements Executive Council considers applications for Status four times a year in January, April, July and October and advises the Governor as to whether or not they may be granted.

Status does not now become effective immediately on approval of an application; the grantee must attend a Status Ceremony and make the Pledge.

#### West ferry terminal uncertainty remains

COUNCILLORS are once again considering whether the new West Falkland terminal for the cross sound ferry should be at Port Howard or Second Creek.

They say they are not simply looking at cost but also the long term prospects for the area.

A number of months ago it was decided that the new terminal would be sited at Port Howard, near where the jetty currently stands, despite a road having already been built to Second Creek.

However, at a meeting of the Transport Advisory Committee held on Tuesday, Councillor Mike Rendell explained that, as it was a hypothetical possibility that any new South American Atlantic Shipping (SAAS) vessel may be too large to use Fox Bay's port, it was pertinent to consider whether it would be able to instead use Port Howard or Second Creek. As a result, the siting of the ferry terminal needed to be re-examined, to tie it in with a future deep water port.

While Cllr Rendell revealed he was personally in favour of building the terminal at Port Howard, Cllr Hansen said it should be considered that, as people become accustomed to the ferry service over the years, the amount of animals and vehicles using the service should increase and the bigger space available at Second Creek, may be advantageous. There is space to expand at Second Creek, if necessary, he said, whereas this is limited in Port Howard.

The final decision on where the terminal will be built is expected to be made by Executive Council in September.

#### 'Jail break' investigation

FIVE police officers are reported to be under investigation for allegedly permitting a detained person to escape from Stanley's police cells earlier this month.

The investigation is believed to have followed the detention of a juvenile.

Acting Chief of Police Len McGill yesterday commented, "An investigation is underway into the circumstances surrounding the removal of a person held in custody in Stanley police station."

He said none of the officers have been suspended.

# Smiles abound as kids make the college grade

THERE will be many smiling young faces seen in Stanley during the next few days as the results of the GCSE examinations, announced yesterday morning, sink in.

This year 50% of the students have achieved five or more A* - C grades in their GCSE examinations.

Of the 15 pupils who aspired to attend college in the United Kingdom, twelve are now packing their suitcases and looking forward to a new chapter in their educational career.

The Director of Education,

Mrs Barbara Booth, reported that several students had done exceptionally well, exceeding the required 42 points for further education at Peter Symonds; in one case by as much as 29 points.

"Their commitment to study and hard work must be congratulated," she commented.

Last year only 38% of GCSE students gained five or more A* -C grades. Mrs Booth commented, "Although there will inevitably be variations between year groups and where the groups are small, percentage points can mask the true picture; this set of results represents a considerable improvement in standards."

She said this "very welcome" improvement in standards overall is a combination of the efforts of staff and pupils alike and, "...should be acknowledged and celebrated."

She added, "The results should stand as the benchmark for further development and improvement. Well done and congratulations to the young people and teachers."

WHEN the idea of giving councillors the option of being fully paid was first broached more than eighteen months ago, my first thought was, "Why not?

In the run up to every election in recent years I for one have be-moaned what I saw as the problem of only self-employed people or those with very understanding employers being able to consider standing, such was the impact council duties would have upon the job of a regular wage slave. By making the role of councillor more of a 'regular' job, I reasoned, surely you could attract a wider - and younger - crop of candidates.

However, now that we are into the nitty gritty of the idea, I don't mind admitting I am having second thoughts and, despite what seemed to be almost unanimous approval at the public meeting on the issue last week, I don't think I'm alone. There were only around a dozen members of the public at the meeting and I'm worried their support for the concept will lead councillors to think everyone is agreed on the concept

I have a number of reservations about the leap to allowing fully paid councillors, many of which have been discussed at length through the media in the past twelve months: that we may end up with a two tier system in which the full timers will somehow feel they have authority over their part time counterparts and that the full timers won't actually have enough work to do and end up meddling in issues they shouldn't.

An important argument I heard this week - and one which I think we should all consider seriously - is the effect being fully paid could have on the way a councillor makes decisions. At the moment their decisions are (we hope) led by a moral sense of what is best for the Islands; however, should a councillor have concerns about losing a fully paid job, they may be more inclined to base decisions on what will win votes in the next election.

The idea of introducing the fully paid option two years into the life of this council is also questionable. The reasoning - of wanting to the test the system before it is inherited by the next council - is admirable but the current council was elected on a specific footing and to alter that now, midway through their term, seems improper.

I don't begrudge them a decent hourly wage and would support paying councillors more than they get at the moment for the time they put in. But I am still not entirely comfortable with the leap to being fully paid.

Everyone I have chatted to about this in recent weeks has had an opinion on whether or not councillors should be fully paid but few have expressed a view in public. Don't forget the *PN* letters page is there for your use and FIRS is hosting a phone in on the issue on Monday evening.

### Is govt spending out of control?

"ARE we living beyond our means?"

That's the question businessman Stuart Wallace put to councillors at the monthly public meeting held on Tuesday

Following a long discussion on the funds invested in the abattoir (see page 4,) Mr Wallace told the panel, "...revenues are not increasing as we'd like them to and yet we are spending more than we ought." He said there is a growing

sense of unease about the scale of spending on infrastructure, particularly in rural projects, and he is worried that, "...we may be living beyond our means."

Councillor Clausen responded that expectations are much higher today "...and, if you look at the matter proportionately, you would conclude that expectation is much higher in Stanley than in Camp - in terms of education and health just for starters," while Cllr Summers said the economy re-mains strong: "We have a lot of reserves and no borrowing and we have the capability of continuing to set balanced budgets."

Mr Wallace disagreed, how-ever. He commented, "I've spoken to economists and accountants who say the Falklands have a very good reserve but revenues are not keeping pace with our ex-penditure and that trend, if we don't take some sort of action, could be dangerous."

Councillor Summers admitted that over the last 15 years or so, the revenue line has been, "pre-dominantly flat," and added, "we have continued to take measures

to try to improve that." The budget has had to be structured to deal with a "substantial loss" of the illex fishery licence fees, he said, but that loss has been offset from income in, "...other growing areas - from tourism, taxa-tion and investment in reserves."

He acknowledged that the cur-rent position, with balanced budg-... is not ideal" but added. don't think the economy is anywhere near being out of control and if we wanted to set a surplus of three million, I think we could. Nobody would like it very much but we could do it." Mr Wallace asked if council-

lors felt they could defend their decisions on infrastructure and the rural economy: "Would you not agree with the suggestion that too much of our resources are going that way - not just monetary but human, developmental, instead of doing other things?'

Cllr Clausen did not. She commented, "There are things in place to try and address some of those areas where we are subsidising in Camp. In terms of the abattoir, there isn't a single person on council who doesn't want to see that subsidy reduced to nothing, but we have to be realistic, too.

Closing the discussion, Cllr Summers told the meeting the focus should not solely be on agriculture.

The "...brightest new industry" in the Falklands, he said, is tourism. "It will have limited potential without a decent Camp infrastructure because not everyone wants to come and look at Stanley ...

#### Aging FIGAS fleet to be assessed

AN ASSESSOR from Brittan Norman is to visit the islands to examine the Islander aircraft which was damaged upon landing at West Point Island last November.

The acting General Manager of the Falkland Islands Government Air Service (FIGAS), Captain Derek Clarke, told the Transport Advisory Committee on Tuesday that the assessor will advise FIGAS what can be done with Islander Bravo India.

He will also carry out a survey of the rest of the fleet to advise the government on its options for the future, including part exchange of aircraft in the replacement of the current aircraft.

The FIGAS fleet consists of airframes ranging in age from 13 to 26 years and the cost of maintenance is significant; one aircraft needs more than 1,000 hours of corrosion maintenance, Captain Clarke told the meeting.

Decisions on replacement of the aircraft have been put off for years, he added, and now need to be made as a matter of urgency; procurement - from placing the order to delivery - can take twelve to fifteen months.

As for the coming season, he reported that FIGAS has two and a half passenger aircraft available for the summer - "...three some of the time, two most of the time."

Also discussed at the meeting was the carriage of heavy loads overland. Three people are able to grant exemptions for loads exceeding the weight limit to be driven on Falklands roads.

The Commander of British Forces can give permission to military plant and vehicles, the Chief Executive to government vehicles and the Director of Public Works, Manfred Keenleyside, to private sector vehicles.

Mr Keenleyside told the TAC that assessments of whether or not roads are fit to hold heavy loads are made by the PWD Highways Section with advice being taken on occasion from individuals living in the area near the relevant piece of road.

He assured the meeting that all three parties aim to apply the same standards before granting permission for heavy loads to be carried but said that the benefits to individuals are also considered.

He explained, "We sometimes get late requests for the movement of stock to the abattoir; we try to be more flexible with that as it is seen as necessary."

Engineer Chris McLean pointed out to the meeting that a lot of the loads that cause damage to the Camp roads actually fall under the fifteen tonne weight limit.

### **Court news**

#### Fined for failing to stop at zebra crossing

A STANLEY man has been fined £470 for failing to stop at the pedestrian crossing by the Post Office and driving without due care and attention

In the Senior Magistrate's Court on Wednesday, Crown Counsel Julia Kraelyn-Smith told the court that on July 31, during the busy lunchtime traffic, Felipe Andres Mery Bahamondez (22) approached the zebra crossing as a woman was crossing the road. She had to stop to prevent an accident and the driver did not appear to have seen her at all.

Ms Kraelyn-Smith said Mr Bahamondez did not see the pedestrian and had admitted he was watching his little brother in the rear view mirror at the time.

Mr Bahamondez who has a previous conviction for driving with undue care and attention in 2003 apologised to the court saying he had seen the woman but it was too late to stop

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said she was concerned that the offence involved the pedestrian crossing at such a busy time of the day. She said it is a particularly important crossing being near the Post Office and the school. "Pedestrians are not safe when you are driving like that," she said.

Mr Bahamondez was fined £150 for failing to give precedence to a foot passenger, £250 for driving with undue care and attention and ordered to pay £70 costs.

Licence returned

Two years after he was banned from driving for three years Kenneth Stewart has had his licence reinstated.

Mr Stewart made the application on Wednesday with no objections lodged by the Crown.

Mrs Faulds read out a letter of reference from Jock Elliott of the Special Employment Scheme which said that over the last three months Mr Stewart has made a conscious decision to move forward and, as it stands now, ...would not have any hesitation in recommending him to employ-

Mr Stewart in a written submission to the court said he was, "inhibited and hindered" from getting work because of his lack of driving licence.

Mrs Faulds said she was impressed by the reference from Mr Elliott, adding that the Court wants to support people who can learn from their mistakes.

She said his licence would be returned from October 5, a full two years after the ban was put in place.

#### 'Kirchner's government most corrupt ever'

PRESIDENT Nestor Kirchner's most administration is the " corrupt ever in Argentina," claims former President Carlos Menem, in an interview with Chile's El Mercurio

The interview was undertaken soon after Mr Menem was defeated in his bid to become governor of his hometown province of La Rioja, which he has dominated for a quarter of a century

"What we are seeing is rampant corruption. This is the most corrupt government ever in the his-tory of Argentina," he said.

Mr Menem described Cristina Fernandez de Kirchner, the First Lady running for president in October as a woman, "...full of ambitions, hatred and grudges."

The former president said that the current Kirchner administration does not respect democratic institutions, the Armed Forces and security forces are constantly under attack and, "... if this is not enough he is now after the Church."

The only way out of this situa-

tion is impeachment of the President and his cabinet, he said.

He was also very critical of the political campaign in support of the Kirchner administration's candidates in La Rioja.

'They flooded the province with gifts: with all sorts of white goods such as cookers, fridges, washing machines, water closets, you name it, plus plots of land and anything they could get hold of, obviously with the Treasury's money. It was a gigantic, phenom-enal fraud," said Mr Menem.

In spite of the election results Mr Menem says he will keep fighting for La Rioja, Argentina, world peace and love among people, "...as I have always done.

On the campaign trail Mr Menem was accompanied by his daughter Zulemita and son Nair who he only recognised a few years ago but was a success among young followers as a result of his recent part in the Big Brother television show. MP/PN

MARKING the 25th anniversary of the Falklands war, the BBC World Service held a Calling the Falklands programme reunion lunch at Bush House for staff involved in the programme before, during and after 1982.

Former popular presenters Pe-ter King, Kathleen Cheesmond and others sent greetings and good wishes to the Islanders, whom they remember with affection.

However Mr Briley said there was "...little support from Islanders or the Falkland Islands Association for a programme regarded by some as no longer needed and facing competition from television and other services now available in the Islands."

The BBC have since begun to give help in training Falklands radio staff

#### Omni DC10 new aircraft for airbridge



STARTING next month, the UK airbridge will be run by Air Omni Air Partner using International operating a DC10.

Earlier this month the Ministry of Defence (MoD) awarded a one year contract for operating the airbridge to Air Partner with the contract coming into effect on October 4, 2007

The aircraft has been fitted to provide 12 business class seats, 260 economy seats and two stretchers.

Sqd Ldr Simon Barnes said the the economy seats have a larger pitch than other tenders, ... which will be more appropriate for longhaul travel and offer greater comfort for passengers." The DC10 to be operated is a

newer airframe than the Boeing

747 currently supporting the route and offers a greater payload than the military Tristar C2 upon which the Statement of Requirement was based, he said.

"The DC10 operator has potentially greater flexibility to recover technical problems as the operator has a large fleet of DC10s and there is currently a reserve aircraft stationed at their base in Shannon," Sqd Ldr Barnes explained. "The ability to provide a same

type replacement aircraft will enhance the speed of recovery post technical problems, as the crews will already be in place."

MoD will continue to speak with FIG on the future development of the service, he added.

# Letter sparks defence of abattoir spending Private sector - in Camp and Stanley - is benefiting, say councillors

THE Falkland Islands is not unique in the way it subsidises agriculture, and the government will continue this support for the foreseeable future.

So said councillors at their monthly public meeting, held in the Court and Council Chambers on Tuesday.

In a letter to *Penguin News* published last week. Stanley resident Mike Forrest questioned the continuation of the annual operating subsidy to the abattoir of over half a million pounds and this letter was clearly in the forefront of councillors' minds at the meeting.

Council spokesman, Mike Summers, welcomed debate on the issue but defended the investment made in the abattoir.

For a number of years, he said, the Falklands have been trying to move away from direct subsidies to farmers and find ways in which agriculture can become either more profitable or find other ways for rural residents to earn income.

The concept of the abattoir, he said, was to provide an opportunity for farmers to develop, "...new streams of activity and new forms of income."

He is convinced this is happening: "There are now large amounts of money flowing through the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) back out into the farming community and, indeed, into other parts of the business community.

"In fact, in the last financial year, FIMCo paid to local Falkland Islands businesses, both in Stanley and in Camp, in excess of £1.2 million in goods and services, for a subsidy from the government of £600,000."

FIMCo General Manager, John Ferguson, provided the figures to support this (see table below). He said, "The general public may be interested (and a little shocked) to learn how much revenue actually finds its way into the private sector and it could be argued that 85% of the FIMCo subsidy doesn't make it out to Camp.

"FIMCo has a policy of sourcing as much as possible from local suppliers from packaging to spares to food and industry type clothing, to name but a few."

Councillor Summers told the public meeting everyone has to consider whether the transfer of public money into the private sector in that way is a good thing or not. "It would be my contention, from an economic view, that at least for a period of time, that is sustainable."

However, he acknowledged that this is not a situation which should

## **RBA responds: 'Camp used as a** stick to beat councillors with'

ON behalf of Members, the Rural Business Association would like to make the following comments on last week's letter to the Editor by Mr Mike Forrest.

Mr Forrest is perfectly entitled to both form and express his opinion on the actions of councillors in terms of economic decisions affecting the Camp. In fact we hope that councillors positively encourage the population to scrutinise and analyse all council decisions. At the same time the letter is disquieting in that it gives the appearance of an individual using the farming community as little more than a convenient stick to beat councillors with.

To be specific, Mr Forrest takes the council statement, "....Camp will remain viable as a well-populated and economically and socially sustainable community," and focuses upon the word 'remain', saying councillors are suggesting camp is viable when it has not been economically sustainable for many years.

Mr Forrest has a point of course – no one is going to argue that the Camp population has not, and does not continue to struggle (although it is entirely inaccurate to say all camp businesses are not viable and Mr Forrest acknowledges that in one of his final paragraphs) - at the same time, we would ask how can one keep a struggling community 'well-populated and 'socially-sustainable' if one is not prepared to offer economic support. If you will excuse us for hammering the point home, if one removes economic support then one might be in danger of depleting the population further.

Is Mr Forrest suggesting that endangering the continued existence of a Camp population is a 'viable' option?

The RBA does not find it helpful that Mr Forrest appears to have taken a single phrase out of context, to the detriment of an entire population, presumably in order to embarrass councillors.

Mr Forrest ends his attack with the comment: "It appears that our Elected Members put this failure (falling population) down to not spending enough and that they are determined to spend even more of our dwindling resources on this small sector of the economy."

First of all, who does he refer to with the word 'our' – is not the camp population included in those deserving of economic support?

Secondly Mr Forrest's comment is, apart from being shockingly sweeping, little more than an unhelpfully sarcastic interpretation of an entire decision-making process.

If Mr Forrest wishes to be constructively analytical may we suggest he propose some helpful concepts with regard to preserving the Camp population as opposed to simply assigning a hard-working and determined community as whipping boy. carry on forever and said FIMCo has produced a scenario in it can, "...break even in, I think, three or four years." He explained, "That relies on a number of suppositions about how farms continue to develop, the number and types of animals that come through, and the market price in Northern Europe. But I'm happy to continue supporting it on that basis."

While stressing the need to support the Camp, Tim Miller worried that the government seemed to be, "...running into the danger of spending £6 to actually get £2 into the farmer's pocket."

Would it not be much cheaper, he asked, to go back to some form of direct subsidy where the farmer would probably get more and cost the government less?

Mr Ferguson said Mr Miller's example could be misleading and said that, in fact, more than three quarters of the subsidy reaches the farmer.

Cllr Summers felt the figures from the abattoir would suggest that is not the case, and commented, "It is anticipated on very reasonable assumptions about market price that the subsidy necessary for FIMCo in a couple of years could drop to £300,000.

"If you're generating a return of £1.1 million from a public input of £300,000, then that's not a bad equation. It does depend on people's individual views of (using) public money to support private sector enterprise."

Stuart Wallace expressed concern at how much expenditure has so far been invested in the abattoir - estimated by councillors at the meeting at between £5-7 million.

However, councillors remained committed. Cllr Summers summed up the feeling: "We are paying £600,000 or thereabouts to provide a significant amount of income into the farming community. I can remember years ago now, we were paying £1 million a year in direct subsidy. Surely it has got to be better to be finding ways for farmers and other business enterprises in the Camp to make additional income through that kind of enterprise than it is to go back to that dreadful direct subsidy."

"Agent for change" After five years of export production, the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) is now becoming internationally recognised. To date, meat and by-products have been sold into six EU and two South American countries.

Echoing councillors, Mr Ferguson was keen to stress FIMCo is not a straightforward business and was set up as an, "agent for change", providing farmers with an alternative source of income from wool alone, "It is still very much in the project stage, as farms work through the changes required in their farming system."

Over 75% of farms now supply FIMCo with livestock, with the greatest change being in the number of farms supplying lambs. Nine farms supplied lamb in 2005, 17 (n 2006, increasing to 27 in 2007.

In August 2006, the government directed FIMCo to align itself with the Department of Agriculture's Ten Year Plan, which it has now done, and has produced its own five and ten year projections, which have been approved by the government.

This, Mr Ferguson revealed, includes, "... a strategic change in lamb pricing, for the most productive carcases for both FIMCo and producer, for the short-medium term."

Livestock pricing is aimed at improving the end product for the customer, he said, whether in the local or export markets. "Whilst there are difficulties encountered along the way, this strategy has shown good results to date and customers have commented on the improvements in beef quality over the past year or so."

Mr Ferguson argues there are infrastructure issues and commercial restraints which severely limit FIMCo's ability to operate as cost effectively as it would like, including livestock transport, utility costs and shortage of seasonal labour.

He commented, "The plant itself was built on a UK slaughterhouse design, and not as a meat processing plant, despite always having planned to process and freeze 100% of its export product.

"This, of course, has had a severe impact on the efficiency and ability to add value to its product. FIG has recognised this, and a staged series of upgrading is being worked through."

#### New measures to help smokers quit?

RECOMMENDATIONS from the working group for the possible prohibition of smoking in public places to go to ExCo next month will contain suggestions for a five pronged manoeuvre to encourage smokers to quit the habit.

As well as the ban on smoking in enclosed public places and the raising of the legal age for smoking discussed in the last Legislative Council, an increase on duty on cigarettes, free cessation aids and clinics and the reviving of the DARE programme were discussed at what Councillor Clausen said would be the last meeting of the group.

"Keep it simple" was the message from the working group, with regard to legislation referring to definitions of an enclosed public space and the possible enforcement alternatives to a criminal prosecution once the ban is in place.

The issue of raising the duty on cigarettes and tobacco created some lively debate with Chamber of Commerce representative Mike Forrest saying he was not in favour of the move. He felt that, combined with the other proposals, it is a bit like "bludgeoning" smokers into giving up. Mr Forrest felt it would impact few people and was instead in favour of education and assisting people to quit, adding that it is, "...too painful for those that can't give up."

Chief Medical Officer, Dr Roger Diggle, told the group that smoking is the most addictive drug known to man and is harder to give up than heroin. If there was to be an increase in duty, he felt, it needs to be a big step (50% minimum) as gradual increases in the cost of a packet of cigarettes has proven that people adjust quickly.

While some people may believe councillors are in favour of raising tobacco tax as a method of increasing revenue. Cllr Summers insisted that duty increases have never been about raising revenue and have always been a way of supporting the Health of the Nation.

Cllr Clausen was not in favour of a hefty increase on duty unless cessation aids and clinics were to be free, adding that she considered a 100% increase necessary to make it work.

Pending approval in Executive Council, Standing Finance Committee will make the decision on any increase, "...dependent on assessment of the wealth of the nation," said Cllr Summers.

He wants to see more effort applied to discouraging young people from smoking, and felt that the DARE programme is not enough. While acknowledging that the Health of the Nation is not the duty of the Education Department he said he would like to see them become more involved.

While acknowledging the problems the police force is having in trying to deliver the programme in schools, he recommended, as he had in an earlier Police Committee meeting, that someone from DARE come to the Islands and train others.

Cllr Summers also felt an active advertising campaign could be utilised. "We rely on others such as BFBS television for advertising and we as the government don't do anything positive."

With regard to those who flout the ban, a fixed penalty notice was considered the way to proceed as an alternative to criminal prosecution. However the group felt that they should hold a discussion with the Police to see what practical issues they envisage.

The new Chief of Police is due to arrive in the Islands in early September and the group felt it would be useful to look at any problems in the UK in the last couple of months which may have followed the implementation of a smoking ban.

The draft policy will now go to the October meeting of Executive Council when, if it is accepted, a timetable will be set for the implementation of the proposals.

#### Winter madness raises funds for SAMA82



MORE than £2,100 was raised during the Mid Winter Swim this year, all of which will be donated to SAMA82 to assist with flight costs for the November pilgrimage.

After certificate and t-shirt printing costs were deducted, the total sum raised was  $\pounds 2,180.15$ , said Siân, adding, "...this is just short of being able to pay for two flights on the airbridge."

"If anyone still has sponsor money to hand in can you pass it onto the SAMA treasurer Kevin Ormond or pay it into the bank, quoting SWAMS," said Siân.

# **Education Board update**

THE Director of Education, Barbara Booth, has been in discussion with the States of Jersey and plans are progressing for a joint curriculum project with students in both the Community School and the Infant and Junior School.

Mrs Booth said part of the project will use web cam technology so that students have the opportunity to talk face to face with their counterparts in Jersey.

Representatives from the University of Magelenes in Punta Arenas are due to visit the Islands this month. They will meet with the Directors of Education and Agriculture and Minerals to seek ways in which there can be closer links, "...particularly in Agriculture studies," said Mrs Booth adding that short term secondment and exchanges could also be an option.

#### Camp Education holidays

A proposal is to be put before Executive Council to bring the leave entitlement of travelling teachers in line with those of mainstream staff.

With improvements in transport links it is easier for both pupils and staff to move around the Islands and therefore the need to remain "on the job" over public holidays and half term holidays is no longer essential, said Mrs Booth.

A recent survey conducted by Camp Education indicated that 66% of respondents felt that these occasions were beneficial as family time when siblings were home from Stanley Hostel.

The Education Board were told



the Children and Young People's Strategy Group met earlier this month and received an update on "embryonic" plans being developed to create a skateboard park.

The Director of Education also gave a report on progress being made within the Education Department on the Action Plan and feedback from students on issues which affect young people. She said that plans for a Child Awareness event in November are now being formulated.

#### Lunch time provision

The subject of care being provided for children in the Infant and Junior School during lunch times was discussed and the continued interest from Stanley Kids Zone noted.

Mrs Booth said that, following a questionnaire sent to parents there was no clear 'for or against' the idea of lunch time provision for children, however feedback indicated that if it was in place parents would make use of it.

The Board were agreed that it needed to be a private sector initiative and would have nothing to do with school staff.

Councillor Janet Robertson said that the government should provide premises but nothing more, adding that the practicalities should be explored with an. "open and enthusiastic mind."

Mrs Booth will now talk with the Headteacher of the Infant and Junior School to explore the practicalities and follow through with Stanley Kids Zone.


#### Falklands 'an important part' of Jim Kerr's life

#### Hospital focuses on patient satisfaction

Again, this information will be used to help "improve and action" any areas of concern.


Mrs Heathman added, "Please be assured that patient's identity and confidentiality will be respected in these surveys and any published results."

# **Underwater discoveries from around the Islands**

THE Shallow Marine Survey Group (SMSG) has continued its efforts to redress the gap in knowledge of the shallow marine environment around the Falkland Islands over the winter, at times diving in some challenging conditions, mainly concentrated around the Falkland Islands Government Nature Reserve, Kidney Island, in Berkeley Sound.

Here Paul Brickle shares just a a few of their winter highlights.




Fig1. The spectacular carnivorous flamed nudibranch or seaslug, Aeolidia papillosa.

While diving around Kidney Island in June we came across our first flamed sea slug (*Aeolidia papillosa*) (Figure 1) and witnessed rather interesting behaviour. This nudibranch or sea slug, which is essentially a shell-less snail, is known to prey upon the small sea anemone *Antholoba achates* (Figure 2).

As the nudibranch made its first attack the anemone detached from its rock and floated away in the current. After a little research back in the lab we found some literature reporting on this same unusual escape behaviour in southern South America.

This winter we also managed to identify a second species of serolid isopod. These small crustaceans with flattened bodies look a little like fossilised trilobites. They occur all around the Southern Ocean from the shallows to the abyssal depths. Although we knew there were two species inshore it was not until this winter that we confirmed the identity of the second one.

Acanthiserolis schythei (Figure 3) is the larger and most common species in the inshore waters of the Falkland Islands whereas Cristaserolis convexa is smaller and has a smoother rounded shape (Figure 4). Both inhabit sandy bottoms to a depth of about 40m and are

most common at depths of less than 20 m. Males and females of both species can be commonly seen riding "piggy back" in a mating clinch. Younger/smaller Acanthiserolis schythei can sometimes be found in rock pools. Both species are important to the ecology of sandy/muddy environments as they are scavengers and thus aid nutrient cycling.

Over the next few months we will continue our work around Kidney Island and in Port William both on the beaches and rocky shores as well as underwater to depths of 20 m. Later on in the Spring we will conduct an ambitious series of diving expeditions to collect specimens and photographs around Beaver. Weddell and New Island on the RV Damien II and will report back with our findings.

# Where in the world ?

From radio technician with the Metropolitan Police to managing a communications networks for the ruler of Dubai, Islander David Hardy (58) tells of his varied and much travelled working life since leaving the Islands armed with three GCEs obtained by correspondence course.

I LEFT the Falklands in early 1972 to go to the UK to get myself a technical education, hopefully, by joining the RAF. I was armed with three GCE's and 2nd year C+G 271 all obtained by correspondence, course with generous help from expats and Islanders alike.

My entry into the RAF was complicated by politics and, although finally accepted a year after initially applying, I opted to join the Metropolitan Police, and work as a Radio Technician. This offered day release for college study, as well as a good working environment. One interesting thing was one of the interviewers said out of the blue, "Where is Kent Road, with respect to Davis Street?" He was Lt Cdr Adam and had been at the Naval Radio Station at the Head of the Bay in WW2.

Most of my time was spent driving around London, visiting Police Stations and high-rise buildings maintaining the hand-held radio network. Also, occasionally dropping in on Kelpers Bill Richards and Ian Biggs, who were serving in the MP.

In 1974 I managed to obtain two FA Cup Final tickets so I took Owen May to see Sunderland beat Leeds Utd. An unforgettable day out, even for a Spurs supporter

I completed the C+G 271 Full Tech in 1975 and in 1977 after three promotions and soon to be in charge of 50 technicians, I reached a crossroads in my career. Did I want to sit out the next 36 years waiting to rettre on a good indexed linked pension, or see some of the world?

The first job I noticed in the papers was with IAL (then a subsidiary of British Airways) in Tanzania, repairing radars. I called them and said I knew nothing about radars, but was offered an application form and, as they say, the rest is history.

My first posting was Winnipeg, Canada, where IAL were contracted to install and commission, what was at that time, one of the longest digital microwave systems in the world. (500+ miles) I did everything from opening the cases to customer acceptance of the system. Lots of fun, especially in the pubs in the Indian reservations!

Amazingly, one night whilst sitting at traffic lights in Winnipeg, Robert Rowlands and Ian McPhee, stepped out of a pub alongside my car! Sheer coincidence.

I married Linda Baulch from Croydon on December 20, 1977.

In 1978 I was sent to Libya to work on the Oil Companies Radio Network in Tripoli. Loads of old valve radios. Good times, but three years was enough. One of my colleagues was Len 'Lofty' Tyson, ex-FIDS.

Our daughter Joanne was born on November 21, 1981, in Croydon. Next stop was Doha, Qatar. IAL were contracted to supply, install and commission a nationwide

military comms system. Again three years was enough and although we enjoyed it, we left in early 1984.

1984 was a difficult year as IAL lacked accompanied postings, so I said I would give it a year. I had two, three month trips to oilfields in Egypt, and one month in Saudi Arabia looking after the check-in system at Dhahran airport. A place best avoided!

Whilst working in Egypt I got a call from an ex-Doha colleague offering me a job in Dubai, UAE. I agreed to take it, and on April 5, 1985 flew to Dubai, and joined HO Schlechter, Consulting Engineers and Communication Specialists.

My responsibilities were looking after digitally encrypted Motorola communication systems used by the ruling Maktoum family together with those in certain areas of the military intelligence. In early 1992 Schlechte lost all

In early 1992 Schlechte lost all his government contracts and I was invited by His Highness Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum, now The Ruler of Dubai, to join his payroll and set-up and manage his Radio Service Centre, doing all the previous tasks and more, such as camel racing communications!

It is now 2007 and 1 am still here. We have five Pakistanis one Sri Lankan, one Indian, one Filipino, two UAE nationals and of course one Kelper on our staff, quite a mix!

Sadly my wife, Linda, lost a long

battle with cancer in 1997, but I remarried in 2003 after meeting a wonderful lady. Jinyan, from Tianjin, China.

Joanne my daughter is now 26 and continues to live here in Dubai. She recently graduated from Heriot-Watt University with a BBA and speaks fluent Arabic; something; sadly. I have failed to learn well. God help me. I now have to learn Mandarin!

I used to play squash and go sailing regularly but have slowed down a bit now. I still enjoy travelling, and have visited about 30 countries, but it is always difficult to get leave from work.

Hopefully I will continue to work for a few years more, then we will retire to China, and keep a flat here in Dubai which will not be completed until July 2008.

What do I miss about the Falklands? Well sometimes I think it would be nice to spend a summer there and travel to old haunts and do lots of walking and take in the natural beauty and wildlife. I do miss the wind actually. I am planning a return trip as soon as I retire.

Could I live there permanently? The thought of the long, damp winters, still bother me! I have become a hot weather person and although I perspire profusely from the head, of all places, I am happier in 45-48C than in a Falklands July! In Canada I experienced +40C to -40C but the cold was very dry and not a problem with the correct clothing!

# Start saving for retirement as soon as possible Sheepskin tanning underway at Hill Cove

IT'S all too EASY to put off saving for retirement, but it's not something only the over 40s should take seriously. You're never too young to start putting money aside says Pensions Clerk Nigel Dodd; in fact, he says, the sooner you start saving, the better.

The majority of Falkland Islands residents are subject to the state scheme which until 1996 was called the Old Age Pension and guarantees a minimal level of income in retirement But will this be enough for you when you retire?

Another opportunity to save comes in the form of the Falkland Islands Pension Scheme (FIPS) which was introduced in 1997 following the Hay Management review of the civil service. Around 99% of the government's employees opted to join the scheme, along with a number of private sector workers.

At the moment the fund stands at around £21 million: when it was established in 1997 it only totalled £6 million

The FIPS is a money purchase scheme, as Nigel explains: "The more money you have in the scheme, at the end of the day, the greater your pension.

The scheme provides a range of benefits including a pension for life when members reach retirement age, and pensions for their spouse and dependants upon their death. It also gives members options to move between employers within the Falk-

tions to increase the amount of benefits, to defer payment of the pension until age 75 if their normal retirement age is earlier and to take a reduced pension in return for a maximum 25% tax-free lump sum at retirement

The scheme also offers "portability", allowing members to transfer existing pension funds into the scheme and to transfer their pen-

### Who is on the Falkland Islands **Pensions Board...**

#### ...and what do they do?

#### Chairman, Drew Irvine:

"The Pensions Board meet three to four times per year. We have a business plan which serves as a reminder in terms of what issues we need to look at and when. The single most important thing is the review of the investment report from Fidelity which is issued quarterly. The board will go through the report to compare how the funds have performed compared to the benchmark. From the review we will then decide what action if any, needs to be taken.

"We also keep under review what is happening elsewhere and consider whether these would be practical changes which should be made to FIPS. Currently we are looking at whether income drawdown should be allowed. This allows members to take income from their fund without converting all the available fund to an annuity.

"There are also of course housekeeping tasks such as reviewing and renewing contracts for administration, fund management, audit and of course Board Members themselves who are appointed for fixed terms

"Another important issue is ensuring Board members receive appropriate training. We are all Pension Scheme Trustees and need to ensure that we keep up to date with current thinking."

land Islands, to pay extra contribu- sion funds out of the scheme into other pension schemes offering similar benefits

> The FIPS is an Island-wide pension scheme. You do not have to work for one employer, you can be self-employed, you don't have to be employed at all - anyone can be a member

The day to day to administration of the scheme is carried out by Capita, professional pension scheme administrators who control which members own what. The funds themselves are managed by Fidelity who are in charge of choosing the investments for each fund available to members. The Pensions Officer (Nigel) liaises with the administrator over what contribution is being paid by whom.

The scheme has been significantly opened up since 2005 and members now have much more control over their funds.

Nigel explained, "We have five funds that they can invest in which are high, medium and low risk yentures. This allows the individual to have control over their funds to try and get a better return.

Despite being introduced over two years ago, few members of the scheme have opted to become more involved in the way their funds are invested

It's a situation Nigel is particularly keen to see change. "Speaking to a number of people, as soon as they see my brown envelope arriving in their post box, they say. Oh dear, I don't understand it' so they leave it

"Of about 900 potentially active members of the scheme, the level of return we've had is between 50 and 60. There is a lot more of potential for people to actively manage their funds if they so wish."


He encourages more people to join the FIPS: "The bigger the fund the bigger the return and the more we can do with the fund in terms of investments. There's always room for more people to join. If you're not already saving start now You are never be too young to

start paying into the FIPS, Nigel says, and he regularly addresses older school children on the importance of saving for retirement - even though it is often the last thing on their minds. He is keen to stress the impor-

tance of not leaving it too late to start investing in a pension fund: "The more money an individual puts away. the greater sum they will receive at retirement age

"I have a number of people come to me later in life and say 'I've left it a bit late, what can I do about it?' In order to get a reasonable pension. If you only start paying in at 40+, your contributions are going to have to be that much larger. Unless you've got a very good job, you're not going to be able to put a large amount away. So the earlier in life you start, the better

Anyone who thinks it is something they can put off should look at the level of expectation they have for their retirement, as Nigel explains "At the end of the day, it's assumed that by the time you retire you will own your own house and car and the

The beginning of August heralded the arrival of Andrew and Jane, a dynamic couple who own their own tannery, Fenland Sheepskin, and supply a wide range of leathers and sheepskin goods to various well known retail out-

Some of the more unusual projects they have undertaken include a full sheepskin carpet for President Bush's private cinema room and a catwalk for a fashion show. Hats off to the models who managed to strut their stuff on four inches of wool wearing high heels

Henry has collected a wide variety of salted skins from around the Islands for tanning, from lamb to longer woolled mature sheep. "The beauty is in the eye of the beholder: while some might prefer the shorter soft wool of lambskin others like the longer tousled look for a rug," Andrew said.

The last two weeks have been a sharp learning curve for Henry and his helpers at Hill Cove. While Andrew and Jane are using holiday time to help get things under way, 6am to midnight has been a normal day for them as they prepare the skins for market.

"It's been a hugely successful trip," said Henry. "I couldn't have managed without the expertise of Andrew and Jane and it is all for the greater good of Hill Cove and West Falkland," he said adding, "It just might be a step in the right direction.



# Dr Miller: veterinary job was offered to me when I couldn't take up the post, but now I'm underqualified?

VETERINARIAN Diana Miller has challenged the response from the government's Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins, to her complaint that, despite spending thousands on her training, she has not been allowed to obtain a job in the Falklands.

In July, Islander Dr Miller wrote to *Penguin News* alleging that, despite the expense government had incurred in her training and the fact she wished to return home to work, no job was available for her in the Islands.

Responding to Dr Miller's complaints, the government's Chief Executive Chris Simpkins said Dr Miller did not have the experience needed to work as a veterinary officer in the Islands and that she had refused to undertake training as an Official Veterinary Surgeon (OVS).

Dr Miller accepted she did not meet the five year requirement. including three years clinical practice, that the government is demanding of her. "I am short six months on the five year requirement, and my role in Australia (with the State Department of Primary Industries) has been supplemented with on-going clinical practice, but not in a fulltime clinical practice setting for three years."

However, she feels it is "damning" that the Department of Agriculture offered her employment as a Veterinary Officer between August and November of 2004 as a locum, a position she was unable to accept due to the birth of her first child in September 2004.

Now, she says, the government considers she is not experienced enough to be employed to do those same duties. "I doubt that the Department of Agriculture (DoA) would suggest to the community that it employs poorly qualified and experienced locum vets. Consequently, I have repeatedly asked what has changed between then and now?"

#### 'Good faith'

Dr Miller feels she has been acting in "good faith" for the last decade based on what she believed was a contract to train for DoA, paid for by DoA, with the express purpose to return as a Veterinary Officer, and gaining experience in a role in Australia that is directly comparable with the duties performed by vets in the Falklands, and with approval from government.

The question that no-one is prepared to answer, she says, is why has DoA sent her away for this high level professional training, "...yet in ten years have not developed a single plan to get a return on that investment, and further, have allowed the contract that was designed to protect that investment to lapse without any attempt to get a return on it and honour its reciprocal commitment to me to return for three years? This would appear to be an issue of poor corporate accountability."

As for the OVS requirement, Mr Simpkins is being "somewhat mischievous," Dr Miller says. "He knows well that I have not refused to undertake OVS, but rather I advised both him and the Directors of Agriculture and Human Resources that I am unable to do so from here.

"OVS is not a qualification that I can obtain in Australia, and as my current job does not require it, to achieve it I would be forced to resign from my current job, move to the United Kingdom to obtain the qualification, and still without any support or assurance that after doing so I would have a job back home."

Dr Miller says Mr Simpkins' suggestion that all vets in the Falklands must have OVS has never been mentioned to her: "It was a surprise to see such in the *Penguin News*."

Abridged CV Mr Simpkins said Dr Miller had

only provided limited information on her post qualification experience, but she disputes this. "I have provided FIG with a CV containing all the details of my post-qualifying experience."

She admits she did not provide a formal copy of her CV to Mr Simpkins until he finally agreed to answer two fundamental questions that she had asked the government to answer 18 months ago. "I consistently argued that the answers to these two questions were not dependant upon a formal CV to assess my suitability for employment.

"These two questions were i) What is my employment status with DoA, and ii) What is the status of my contract to return to three years of bonded service with DoA? Until June 27,2007, FIG would not provide these answers to me."

Throughout the last four and a half years Dr Miller says she made the DoA "fully aware" of her current employment and the roles and responsibilities it has encompassed, and was encouraged by FIG staff to pursue such without any contrary suggestion. Moreover, she says, she had detailed discussions with both Directors of Agriculture and Human Resources when she met with them in August last year.

She explains, "Prior to June 27 it was my consistent position that FIG/DoA needed to address what the status of my employment with DoA was, and their contractual obligation for me to return to bonded service (for three years). In 18 months I received conflicting opinions from the Director of Agriculture (who told me that she did not believe I was a DoA employee and was not aware of my contract), Human Resources (who wrote that I was an employee, on leave, and would be required to serve three years bonded service 'at some time in the future' when I returned), and Mr Simpkins (who wrote that I was not considered an employee).

"None of these details were confirmed until councillors intervened and directed Mr Simpkins to act upon my request."

#### Unreasonable expectation

Dr Miller feels it is "entirely unreasonable" for the government to expect her to plan her career - "and my family's future well being" without any indication of any career pathway or time frame to return. "Having spent so much money on my training for (and by) DoA, the lack of accountability within DoA/FIG associated with what appears to be no more than a blind here the streame steps in the (die

pears to be no more than a blind hope that at some stage in the (distant) future I will apply for (and successfully compete against other applicants) a vacancy in the DOA and come back home is astonishing."

Dr Miller also disputes Mr Simpkins' allegation that she proposed the government should employ her husband as Senior Agriculture Advisor and that she should initially be employed part time for twelve months. The attached conditions, Mr Simpkins said, were "unacceptable to FIG."

Dr Miller insists there were no conditions, rather "a suggested pathway for me to return". This was done at a time, she said, when known vacancies were to occur within the DoA, "...and potentially made superior use of the range of skills currently employed by the DoA."

She says this suggestion was made because Mr Simpkins wrote to her with the following request: "It would aid the process of ensuring that such paths are mutually acceptable if you would specify what preferences you might hold with regard to future generic or specialist work for the Islands."

His criticism that her suggestion is somehow inappropriate in intent or content is "unbelievable" Dr Miller feels, given that she had provided him with what he requested.

"It is also worthy of mention that my husband applied for the position through the appropriate avenue, which was in response to an advertisement placed in Australian newspapers by the FIG's Australian recruitment consultant.

"There should be absolutely no suggestion of impropriety and my suggestion was certainly not a demand nor was it conditional."

DoA subsequently offered Mr Miller employment as an Agriculture Advisor, however no indication of resolving Dr Miller's situation was made.

#### A matter of contract

This dispute comes down to the issue of a contract, Dr Miller believes.

"In order to undertake in-service training, I was required to sign a contract that states explicitly that if I 'terminate employment with FIG prior to the expiration of the period of 36 months from the course completion date' I would be required to repay £47,472.50 to FIG

"Mr Simpkins states that there was no guarantee of return employment for me. This appears highly contradictory to this clause in the contract. How can 1 'terminate employment' if I am not employed?"

The contract makes no demand for her to gain any experience, Dr Miller alleges. "In fact, the DoA expected me to return home immediately upon completion of my degree, and acquire experience back in the Falklands under the supervision of the Senior Veterinary Officer. "Rather than return home without experience, I requested permission to gain some experience in Australia before returning home, and suggested that three to five years would be appropriate, and this was agreed verbally with the Director of Agriculture at the time, Bob Reid, and the Director of Human Resources.

"Prior to August last year, it was never suggested to me that I must satisfy FIG's new requirement for vets to have a minimum of five years experience, including three years clinical practice, and that I would have to apply for a vacancy when and if one occurred, and compete against other (including overseas) applicants. Indeed Mr Simpkins infers that I should have known of these requirements by observing vacancy advertisements for DoA veterinarians placed occasionally (1 think twice since 2003) in newspapers in Australia."

Dr Miller says the Director of Human Resources subsequently notified her that the terms of the contract (three years bonded service) would commence as soon as she returned to the Falklands after gaming experience. "For nearly two years now I have been asking to return, having advised them since December 2002 that I wanted to return three to five years after completing my degree, but no pathways have been offered for me to do so.

"I have made several suggestions that were appropriate, coincident with vacancies in the department, were cost effective, aligned to the DoA Business Plan, and increased the capacity of DoA.

"None of these suggestions have ever been made as demands, or with conditions attached, as suggested by Mr Simpkins, and at all times I have acknowledged that FIG has the right to reject them. But I have asked for FIG to provide me with an alternative; none have been forthcoming."

tive: none have been forthcoming." She adds. "Mr Simpkins has recently advised that the terms of the contract have expired, thus appearing to release me from this £47,472.50 bond, but FIG still expects me to return but will not tell me how and when this is possible."

Dr Miller says she would happily accept the experiential requirement that FIG are now attempting to impose upon her, and the requirement that she apply for a future vacancy and compete against all applicants if she were "an ordinary student" seeking a career at home after accepting an un-bonded university education grant. "However, the essential difference in my case is that unlike a school leaver accepting an education grant, my training was done whilst I was (and still am) a staff member of DoA, (now on enforced 'special unpaid leave'), and was overseen by a contract that demands that I return for three years or face a significant fine. "When Mr Simpkins now sug-

"When Mr Simpkins now suggests that there was never any guarantee of returning to a job after this training, it clearly ignores the fact that the contract states I must not leave FIG employment or be fined."

#### Wool market report for week ending August 17, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices generally increased at sales in Australia and New Zealand last week. The only exceptions were 24 and 25 micron fleece wool lots which fell by one and seven pence per kilogram clean respectively.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up approximately 2 p/kg clean at 382.2 p/kg clean compared to the previous weeks closing level of 380.8 pence per kilogram clean.

Farmers are advised to exercise caution when using wool prices as shown in this weeks "Micron Price Guide" table due to large currency changes that occurred late last week after the start of auctions.

The impact of such high level currency change is significant on wool prices when they are expressed in terms of p/kg clean. The Australian dollar fell in value relative to the USS (and UK £) by almost 7% during trading on Thursday with such changes working to reduce wool prices by as much as 10 to 15 p/kg clean.

While it is clear that such extreme currency changes reduce wool prices calculated today, it is hoped that wool prices may adjust upwards in response to the currency changes when markets open again next week. However, uncertainty remains a feature of wool markets at this time.

In spite of all of the above, analysts report increased buying interest from Chinese processors and continued low supply as key market issues for the next few sales.

Last week 89% of the 36.442 bales offered to the trade changed hands while in New Zealand 91% of the 7,438 bales available were sold.

Next week approximately 60,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in Australia and New Zealand.

# World first for aquaculture?

THE Aquaculture Project may just have achieved an international first.

At some point on Sunday evening, the twenty male and female zebra trout that are currently held on site began to spawn. This is believed to be the first time that zebra trout (*Aplochiton zebra*) have spawned in captivity and represents an important step in the culture of this species. If a species cannot or will not reproduce in captivity, it is of limited aquaculture potential.

Whilst the aquaculture team cannot take all the credit for the production of eggs in captivity, they are entitled to feel pleased with their efforts.

Biologist, Dan Fowler, commented, "That the fish are breeding successfully shows that they are content and not stressed, and this is down to the work of the guys on the site. However, we still have a big task ahead of us to keep things moving and hopefully produce fry that we can grow to adult size."

Zebra trout are found both here and in Patagonia, where they are also under threat from introduced salmonids, such as trout and salmon. Little is known about their reproductive biology, and the aquaculture team are hoping that by studying the eggs they can glean an extra insight into their lifecycle.

The adult fish, collected from

Half-way House creek near North Arm, spawned on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday night.

Between the ten females held, they released thousands of small sticky eggs, swimming on their sides in order to place the eggs on the vertical walls of the tank, with the males in hot pursuit. "This makes us think that they lay their eggs on overhanging vegetation or something solid in the streams, meaning the fry will hatch in fresh water, rather than the eggs flowing to the sea, and the larvae hatching in salt water," said Dan, "but there are still a lot of questions that need answerine."

### Man on bail leaves Islands

A MAN managed to leave the Islands last Saturday despite being subject to a police bail order.

The man had been arrested for being drunk and disorderly in a public place at Mount Pleasant Airport.

port. The police are unable to apply any bail conditions on a person who is released on police bail during an investigation before charge and the man was, therefore, in possession of his passport.

Acting Chief of Police, Inspector Len McGill commented, "If the person returns to the Falkland Islands and I do not believe that he will, the appropriate action would be taken in relation to his failure to answer bail and in relation to the offence for which he was arrested."

He said the nature of the principal offence is such that it has been decided not to expend money and resources on returning the man to the Islands.



# Thorogood named as new Chief Executive

TIM THOROGOOD is to be the new Chief Executive of the Falkland Islands Government (FIG).

Pre-contract formalities will now begin but it is expected that Dr Thorogood will arrive in the Islands, with his wife, Alison, in January 2008.

According to a statement from Gilbert House, Dr Thorogood has extensive experience in local govemment in the UK having been a Director with Three Rivers District Council and the London Borough of Haringey before becoming Chief Executive of Swansea City and County Council in March 2003.

He is currently Chief Executive of the Local Government Information Unit, a national policy and service improvement organisation aimed at strengthening local government in the UK, a post he has held since July 2006.

Councillor Mike Summers said

this is a "key appointment" to the government, "...and one that requires energy, enthusiasm and commitment as well as relevant skills and experience."

He said he and his colleagues are satisfied they have found, "...the right person for the next stage of our development," and look forward to working with Mr Thorogood to carry out the programmes and projects in hand.

As a child, Dr Thorogood lived for two years in the Islands. His father, Rupert, was the first Cable and Wireless representative to the Islands and brought a team with him to install a new telecomms system for the ESRO Research Station in the 1960s.

Simpkins turns down inter-

view The outgoing Chief Executive has turned down a request from *Penguin News* for a final interview before his departure. After viewing the questions Managing Editor Jenny Cockwell intended to ask, Mr Simpkins said he was not prepared to respond.

The questions focused on some of the more controversial issues of Mr Simpkins tenure, from bullying in government to the private prosecution brought against him by a Stanley housewife in 2004, and also about how he viewed the future of agriculture and coastal shipping in the Islands.

Mr Simpkins told *Penguin News* that some of the questions, "...seek comment on matters that it would, in my opinion, be improper for any official to comment upon and others seek to breathe life into long extinguished fires and I won't be drawn into it."

Mr Simpkins said he intended to leave the Islands quietly, "...no doubt with flag waving by some, rather than with a bang!"

THERE was a definite air of keen anticipation around the place in the past week as we awaited news of the appointment of Chris Simpkins' successor.

Some felt that, in this time of tightened purse strings, the locallybased candidate should have been top choice but the job has gone to Tim Thorogood, one of the UK men.

Reports of a scandal surrounding Dr Thorogood when he was Swansea Council's Chief Executive - he resigned after acknowledging minor planning breaches but denied misconduct - obviously didn't put the panel of councillors off. Perhaps they reasoned that plenty of people here would relate well to the candidate who has had a run in with his local planning committee.

With regard to the appointment process, I do question the wisdom of the final choice being solely up to councillors (a group of people with little or no recruitment experience). Might they not be tempted to opt for a candidate who they feel they can bend to their way of thinking? Or is that, in fact, simply what the Chief Executive's role is - to implement the decisions of the elected representatives?

The person in this position is to be involved in so many areas, everyone has the potential to be affected by the work he does and it would surely be beneficial, therefore, to have input from the private sector on the appointment.

In future, I would prefer to see a panel consisting of representatives not only of council but also the business and rural communities, making the choice together.

MORE eyebrows will have risen this week at the news of the approval of a further £300,000 for the abattoir - this time to resolve "essential and compliance" issues.

The latter particularly concerns me: why do we suddenly not comply? I was of the understanding that the abattoir had an EU-certified vet on site during the export season to ensure we complied fully with EU requirements. How has this changed?

And now we hear on the diddle-dee telegraph that the equipment for this urgent work has not turned up. Does that mean next season's exports are in jeopardy?

# Team works to restore islands

SPEEDY work has been underway to eradicate rats from a group of south western islands.

For two weeks Peter Nightingale, Dion Robertson, Russell Evans and Jim Woodward worked with Leiv, Dion and Sally Poncet laying bait on west and east Channel Islands, Little Coffin and Islet, Skull Bay Island, Stick in the Mud Island and Green Island, all within about five miles of Beaver Island.

Eradication is a time-consuming process, however dry and windy conditions meant the team finished their task in good time.

They spread the bait by hand, with up to seven people walking systematically over each island spreading bait. They used the yacht *Golden Fleece* as their base, anchoring in French Harbour, Staats Island and Beaver each night.

The effort was part of a project part-funded for two years by the FCO's Overseas Territories Environment Programme (OTEP) to rid eight islands in the Beaver Island Group of rats and Patagonian foxes. Also supporting the project are Falklands Conservation, the Antarctic Research Trust, FIG's Environment Studies Budget, Beaver Island Farm and Golden Fleece Expeditions. Leiv is organising all the fieldwork for baiting while Sally is the project administrator.

At the moment, Sally explained, rats pose a huge threat not only to birds but also plants on the islands. It is hoped that by eradicating them, the bird and plant populations will recover to their original predator-free state.

It will take three breeding seasons before the success of the work will be fully known, however Sally plans to conduct a wildlife survey in the area in December which should provide an early indication of whether the number of rats has reduced.

### 'Fat boy seats' to be sold on airbridge

CIVILIAN passengers using the Ministry of Defence airbridge will soon have the option of flying 'business' class.

The government has been in discussion with the MoD for a number of months about the possibility of securing "modest improvements" to the civilian experience of use of the airbridge service.

While reminding the community that it is a primarily a military service and there are limits on what can be achieved, Chief Executive Chris Simpkins reported that the new contract, which begins on October 4, provides for the exclusive allocation of ten business class-type seats for civilian passengers and for FIG to manage the booking arrangements of all civilian seats.

"We are now actively working with the MoD, and the FCO, to develop all the practical booking arrangements," he said.

"It may not be possible to put all these arrangements in place by October 4, but I can confirm that civilians will be able to book business class seat; the premium charge for such seats has not yet been fixed."

### Investigation into cell escape continues

THE investigation into the actions of five police officers who allegedly permitted a detained person to escape from Stanley's police cells is still on-going and no officers have been suspended, the Acting Chief of Police says.

When asked if he supported the actions of his officers in the incident, inspector Len McGill would only say, "The investigations are criminal ones therefore subject to the normal restrictions.

"The files of evidence will be completed in the normal manner and submitted to the Attorney General's Chambers, the prosecuting authority in the Falklands, for their consideration and direction. They will decide if any persons involved in the incident will be charged with an offence."

# Stanley man jailed for assaulting his wife

ONE man was imprisoned for assault and another was warned that he had narrowly missed facing custodial sentence in the Magistrates Court on Wednesday Ryan Hawksworth (22) received

an immediate custodial sentence of 15 months, with four to be suspended, after he pleaded guilty to assaulting his wife on August 12

He also entered guilty pleas to a charge of assaulting a police officer and resisting arrest

Crown Counsel Julia Kraehling-Smith told the court that Mr Hawksworth has a long history of domestic violence which is well known to the police and Social Welfare Department.

She said the offences occurred after an evening when Mr Hawksworth and his wife had been out independa pattern that is normal ently, * when these incidents occur

Mrs Hawksworth invited friends back to their home after the pub and when Mr Hawksworth later returned alone he took exception to this and pushed her in the face and chest foreing her to the floor where he pinned her down Mrs Hawksworth asked him to leave the house, however he refused.

Another person at the house felt threatened by his behaviour and called the police Several officers made their way to the house to find Mr Hawksworth in bed and he became violent when asked by them to leave the house

Ms Kraehling-Smith said Mr Hawksworth, who is under a suspended sentence, is a strong, solidly built man, adding that the police have become wary of attending the household on domestic violence calls.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds reiterated that domestic violence is a very serious matter, warning that once violence starts in a domestic incident, emotions run high and there is a strong risk of a fatal accident

She said it was evident that a suspended custodial sentence did not work as a deterrent and imposed an immediate 15 month sentence (the final four months suspended) for the assault on his wife, six months for the assault on a police officer and three months for resisting arrest, to run concurrently.

### Heavy fine for assault

Melvyn Clifton (27) received a £300 fine for assaulting Craig Williams outside Deano's Bar on

August 11. Ms Kraehling-Smith described it as a "typical pub situation" after closing time. She said that Mr Clifton was reported to have been giving Mr Williams the "evil eye" throughout the evening and that when they met up outside the pub Mr Clifton struck Mr Williams a strong blow to the side of the head with a closed fist, knocking him to the ground. This was witnessed by a number of people including police officers who were on patrol at the time

Ms Kraehling-Smith said there were a number of relevant convictions, the most recent being disorderly conduct two years ago

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds told Mr Clifton that the offence was serious and, had his last conviction been any closer than two years, a custodial sentence would have been considered

She said that she was being fairly lenient on this occasion but added. you will find you will not get any more chances."

Mr Clifton was fined £300 for the offence, ordered to pay Mr Williams £100 compensation and £70 prosecution costs.

### Vodka and Red Bull-fuelled youth attacks police officers

A YOUTH who flew into a vodka and Red Bull-fuelled rage has been ordered to pay compensation to the police officers she assaulted.

The girl, who admitted charges of being drunk and disorderly in a public place, assaulting two police officers and resisting arrest, was given a one year conditional dis-charge, fined £50 and ordered to pay each of the officers £100 compensation

In the youth court on Monday, Ms Kraehling-Smith described the girl's actions on August 12 as "very serious "

The girl was involved in an altercation with her sister, who called a family friend to help. The friend was unable to handle the girl who the prosecution described as, "very angry, very emotional and upset," and called the police. When the police arrived and

tried to calm the situation, the girl repeatedly punched and kicked the officers. Once handcuffed, the girl continued to be, "incredibly abusive," kicking the officers and biting one

Ms Kraehling-Smith told the

### court the police later reported this one of the most violent was arrests they have had to deal with.

The girl's solicitor, Hugh Ferguson, said his client had become distressed after an earlier exchange with her sister and did not remember a great deal about the evening.

He said she deeply regretted and was embarrassed by her actions and wished to apologise to both the police and the family friend

Reading a statement from the family friend, Mr Ferguson said the police could have dealt with the matter differently and a, "more sympathetic approach" may have calmed the situation down. In her statement, the family friend said she was upset by the "rough manner" one of the officers treated the girl and she felt the situation could have been calmed if he had not been so rough

However, Mr Ferguson said his client was "clearly in the wrong." She was, he said, "...a confused and upset girl

He described the evening's events as "traumatic" for both the police and his client. At the close of the evening the youth was hospitalised for treatment to a suspected broken knee, bruises to her head and wrists and black eyes.

Alcohol and Red Bull is a dangerous combination, he told the court, and can cause "bizarre" behaviour, however his client's behaviour was not premeditated. There was an accumulation of factors on the night which are unlikely to be repeated, he said.

In court, the girl read a letter of apology out. She said she had no excuse for her behaviour and promised it would not happen again

### Fruit machine case adjourned

COLIN Leslie Robert Smith (51) from Mount Pleasant was released on bail after his case was adjourned for three weeks.

Mr Smith is alleged to have stolen three gaming machines from Games Tech Leisure Ltd and faces nine charges of theft relating to the machines and the subsequent use of them. He will reappear in court to enter pleas to the charges on September 19

# School feels the pinch as Islands grow

OPTIONS for dealing with increasing pressure on accommodation at the Infant and Junior School are being explored by education officials.

Page 4

The latest Census report showed that the community continues a steady expansion and pressure on accommodation resulting from pupil numbers is increasing.

Custom and practice caters for classes in the primary sector to be at 30 or below. Numbers rising above 30 in any one year group usually result in creating two parallel classes.

This pressure is increased when children within the year group have been assessed as having Special Educational Needs (SEN). Assessment of SEN often requires additional adult support to provide, from time to time, one to one support. The Falklands is not unique in

The Falklands is not unique in its need for SEN facilities, nor in the number of children with special needs, the Director of Edcuation says. "The ratio of SEN to the total children is within the parameters that one might expect in any school.

"The perception that there may be more is possibly due to the more effective recording and tracking of pupils and also that there has been a wish to recognise any potential difficulties as early as possible to provide remedial support before any difficulties become major barriers to learning."

The Islands are in line with the rest of the world in integrating children with special needs into a mainstream school, Mrs Booth says. "They take part as much as possible in the activities of the class. They receive extra support, but where they still cannot access the mainstream activities they undertake alternative tasks."

With advances in ante-natal and neo-natal care there are more children with severe special needs than would have survived in the past and this is is a worldwide phenomenon, Mrs Booth says. However, in the UK, for ex-

However, in the UK, for example, most of these children with significant learning difficulties would attend a special school rather than a mainstream school as is the case in the Falklands.

as is the case in the Falklands. "We have several children who would be "statemented" in the UK and would receive their education in a special unit or school."

She added, "I would however wish to emphasise that the numbers compared to the total school population are not out of the ordinary."

### 'Commitment' criteria for college hopefuls

REVISED eligibility criteria for students seeking sponsorship funding to engage in further education, has been approved by Executive Council and will be implemented from September 2007 for the group of students embarking on a two year GCSE course.

Whilst the eligibility criteria relating to points and grades achieved has been in place for some time councillors were told that quite often students who are very capable often do the minimum required to achieve the academic requirements necessary to qualify for further education sponsorship.

Executive Council approved the addition of three new criteria -"commitment to study, attendance and punctuality" - by which to judge applications for post-16 education grant funding.

### University students

Students are entitled to sponsorship for their university education up to securing their first degree.

Responding to a query from a Penguin News reader, who believed some students received four years of funding while others only received three, Mrs Booth said the majority of degree courses last for three years but some take longer, including medicine, dentistry and veterinary science, and they are all paid for.

"Some language courses require a year spent abroad: some require students to undertake a 'sandwich' year the funding for which is covered either by an employer or by a bursary and therefore are not a cost to FIG. Whatever the length of the first degree course it is covered by the sponsorship."

There is no restriction on which university students can choose to attend.

The government does not, however, provide funding for Masters or Doctoral courses, Mrs Booth said, "...and students who wish to embark on these further studies are encouraged to seek sponsorships through bodies such as the Commonwealth Scholarships Association."

The policy is currently under review.

# Mourning family's battle to get home

A ST HELENIAN family living in the Falklands were devastated to learn of the death of a young relative last week, but their suffering was worsened when they discovered they would have to wait weeks to return to their remote island home for the funeral.

Sara Marie Crowie (27) died on Thursday, August 23, after giving birth by Caesarean section. Her mother and sister are living and working in the Falklands and, along with her aunts and uncles, they are desperate to get home to St Helena.

The island has no airport. The family had hoped to fly to Ascension Island last Saturday and meet the *RMS St Helena* for the sea trip to the island. The *RMS* was due to visit Ascension last week and leave on Friday, so the family asked the Government of St Helena to hold the ship at Ascension for an additional day, allowing them to travel home to be with the rest of their family.

Sara was the caregiver of her 14 year old sister and three year old niece so her family were particularly keen to get home to provide support to the family. They had also been told Sara's body could only be keep in refrigeration for 21 days so they felt they needed to get home as a matter of urgency. However, their request was turned down.

One of Sara's aunts, Jill Roberts, said the reason given for the rejection of their request was, "...it would cost St Helena Government a lot of money to keep the ship in port and the ship would be forced to sail full steam to Cape Town, as they had problems with the crane on board. It was all about the money and the crane. How sad is that?"

On Tuesday, the St Helena Government issued a press statement saying that the island's Executive Council had convened to discuss the request from Jill and her family and it was decided, "after careful consideration," that the departure of the RMS St Helena from Ascension Island should not be delayed. The government stated, "Council's advice was based on the negative financial implications that could materialise for the Island as a whole if the RMS was unable to maintain its current scheduled arrival and departure dates in Cape Town. In addition Council took into account the possibility of any unforescen eventualities that could occur during the current financial year to the RMS St Helena which could involve additional expenditure and impact on the Island's limited financial resources.

Before this decision was taken, Jill had spoken to a councillor in St Helena who said the cost of waiting in port was estimated to be £6,500 and the price would increase to £18,000 because of the need to full steam to Cape Town. Jill says she desperately offered to pay £6,500 to help keep the ship at Ascension but this offer was not accepted.

The family now plans to leave Ascension Island on September 13, arriving in St Helena two days later. The St Helena Government has agreed to hold Sara's body in refrigeration until they arrive. It says it has given, "...all assistance possible, except financially," to the family.

Sara's baby girl, named Alisha, is doing well and is being cared for by her father.

# **News from Executive Council's August meeting**

# Woolco: what progress has been made?

THE decision on whether to grant a request from the Board of the Falkland Islands Wool Company (Woolco) for the release of £135.000 to FIDC to funding the company for its second year of operation has been put off by Executive Council.

ExCo spokesperson, Clir Andrea Clausen, said she and her colleagues felt that although there was some information on the progress of the Woolco during its first ten months of operation, there was no direct comparison with the business plan as approved by Executive Council in 2007.

She commented, "It was difficult to be clear as to exactly how much progress has been made."

ExCo requested a further report to be written by the General Manager of FIDC, illustrating the performance of the company against the original objectives before the release of further funding is further considered.

*Penguin News* contacted a number of the farmers involved in Woolco and none were surprised by ExCo's decision.

Nigel Knight from Coast Ridge Farm commented, "I think that when they started the ball rolling with the original funding last year they did not anticipate the deeply entrenched opposition, stirred up vested interests in UK and opposition to change here in the Falklands.

"I think ExCo are trying to give the impression that they are scrutinising all expenditure in Camp in light of recent criticism of funding aimed at the rural community in general."

Mr Knight felt councillors were "premature" in expecting direct comparisons with historical data held by the Department of Agriculture for member farms on a season by season basis. "This was pointed out to them when they first requested it, but they were insistent on a report at this time which was delivered."

Port Stephens farmer Paul Robertson welcomed ExCo's move saying, "It is only proper that ExCo keep an eye on things - it's a pity they don't do a bit more of it," while Critta Lee of Port Howard described the decision as "fair". He explained, "It is only right that anyone applying for government funding should have to be able to justify the use of that money and if councillors feel that they need more information, than that is what they should get."

Mike and Donna Evans of South Harbour agreed: "It is only right in the current climate, that council-

AS A result of the impending departure and consequent resignation of Chris Simpkins from the Board of Stanley Services Limited, the appointment has been approved of Dr Michael Blanch as a Director of Stanley Services Limited for the period of his appointment as interim Chief Executive of FIG. lors have requested a further report on the progress of Woolco and are being cautious about the release of more funds to allow the company to continue trading in its current form. This does not concern us greatly, as there are other options that could possibly be discussed by stake holders, if the current level of funding required were not to be approved."

All the farmers *Penguin News* spoke to said they remained committed to the Woolco.

Mr Lee felt it was "far to early" to be trying to gauge whether Woolco is living up to expectations or not. He commented, "I am simply pleased that it was up and running in time for this season. For me it's all about the concept behind the company, which is one of farmers getting together to sell their product; that is the most attractive aspect of the company."

Mr Knight acknowledged that not all of Woolco's aims have yet materialised but asked, "Were people expecting miracles?"

He added, "At this stage of the selling season what has been achieved? In our case Sheepsback Insurance has been reduced from almost £2 a bale to £0.60 a bale, marketing costs including freight have been reduced from £0.60 Kg/ cln to £0.36 Kg/cln and wool payments have been prompter than usual and we have been paid what we were told we would be paid."

Mr Robertson said he had found sales this year to be "somewhat slow", which had impacted on cash flow. However, he added, "It has been a difficult and funny old one for wool sales globally though so we are not alone in this."

Mr Knight agreed: "Payments have not been as prompt as promised, although a lot quicker than some UK-based Agents/Merchants. It is too early to say how many new members will be attracted next season."

Prices realised this season seem to be further from the Micron Price Guide, he said, but this was not unexpected as prices have been higher overall and have met with more resistance from buyers.

"Having said that," he continued, "we should not get too obsessed with MPG variance. Timing of sale is perhaps more important.

Mr Knight said he remains convinced that the concept of a. "...local company with local employees," is the way forward for marketing wool, "...in order to realise overall better prices with less costs."

### 2008 illex fee unchanged

THE level of licence fee for the illex fishery for 2008 will remain unchanged.

Considering 2007 was one of the best years on record in terms of catch levels, ClIr Clausen said it was "disappointing" to see the subsequent negative effects on market prices were such that, in order to achieve the 10% fee/revenue ratio, licence fees will need to remain at 2007 Jevels.

# Abattoir works given go ahead

FOLLOWING the approval of up to £300,000 to be allocated to Phase One of the Sand Bay Meat Plant capital works. Executive Council gave the go ahead to the expenditure of funds within the £300,000 for, "...essential construction, the procurement of steel works and other items critical for the compliance related works."

In the lead up to this, a small working group were set up to consider the way forward regarding the proposed capital works, needed for both "compliance and efficiency". Cllr Clausen explained.

Cllr Summers sat on the group with veterinarian Vic Epstein. Abattoir Manager John Ferguson and FIDC General Manager, Mark Brunct.

They split the work into a number of phases according to priority. Those works included in Phase One relate to compliance issues and, Cllr Clausen said, currently the Islands are considered compliant by the competent authority, "...but some of the ways we do things are not great.

things are not great. "If you look in close detail at the EU regulations- it might be questionable as to whether or not we would pass an audit."

She said there is little question that the end product is EU compliant - "...it is the way in which we are forced to carry out some of the operation that is borderline."

### Further discussion on proposals for councillors' pay

THE optional scheme of payment for councillors has been referred back to Gilbert House for further consideration.

A report, commissioned by the Select Committee on the Constitution as a result of discussions to consider ways in which a wider range of candidates could be attracted to stand for election, was presented to ExCo by the independent renumeration panel.

In the paper to ExCo, the panel made a number of recommendations including:

• a suggested annual salary of £21.924 with slightly more for the spokesperson (£24,664);

Lewis Clifton, Maria Strange and other members of the 25 Committee did a superb job in the complex organisation of the programme which unfolded impeccably and was praised by all the guests without exception.

It is not the first time you have all been so friendly and hospitable to me. I recall writing a similar message of thanks courtesy of Penguin News 25 years ago in the aftermath of the Argentine invasion and occupation

I was grateful to the Falklands 'Gluepot' Club for making me their only international honorary life member and to Velma Malcolm for making me an honorary member of the Falkland Islands Association Stanley Committee - unique accolades which I cherish very much. I was delighted to be invited to give a talk to the Gluepot members and thank Robert Rowlands and his fellow members for making me and my wife so welcome.

Over the years I have broadcast or written many reports praising you, the Islanders, for the dignified, energetic and enterprising way you have progressed individually and collectively building a nation anyone would be proud of.

My admiration and respect for you goes back to my first visit in 1981 and has been renewed on all my six visits since. Going back to San Carlos for the memorial service linked to London by the BBC was a nostalgic experience. I have many friends among the Task Force and congratulate you on fulfilling your pledge that you would never betray the bravery and sacrifices of the servicemen. You have demonstrated that by raising funds and welcoming back so many veterans

which they so much appreciate. helping them come to terms with their traumatic experiences. I also challenged Professor Sir Laurence Freedman for his failure in his offi-cial book of the war to acknowl-edge the bravery and pragmatism of so many Islanders in defying the Argentines and aiding the Task Force not least in the Battle for Mount Longdon.

It saddened me to write Terry Peck's obituary for the Times newspaper not long before the 25th anniversary events. I have written too many obituaries for my old friends, among the Islanders and the Task Force

That sadness is tempered by the knowledge of what great people they all were and by the way the young people of the Falklands have shown the same dedication, patri-otism and hard work as their forebears did. I have been so impressed by the achievements of your students as I have watched them since their school days grow in confi-dence and stature and take their place as valuable members of society

Memories of Falklands friendship in contrast to the death threats I received from the cruel Argentine regime came flooding back as I attended so many wreath-laying ceremonies. It was sad and emotional for families of men who died but all of them were so grateful to be invited and made welcome.

### Rapid increase in Shetland ferry use

I READ with interest the front page article last week regarding the location of a ferry terminal on the West and the possibility of increased usage of a regular ferry service. I offer the following informa-

tion purely as an indication as to development in ferries in Shetland since their introduction in the early seventies

The original ferries that covered Yell Sound (the Shetland mainland to the island of Yell and linking the other two north isles of Unst and Fetlar) were 147 gross tonnes with a length of 23m.

The second generation of ships were introduced from the mid 1980's and were around 230 gross tonnes and 30m in length.

The latest two ferries crossing

1 HAVE just watched on Doughty St TV the two lady representatives of your governing council with the Islands' Government representative in London (The Falklands Today).

What a credit they are to your country. They talked about what was happening in the Islands and described life today compared with Yell Sound are 1861 gross tonnes and the length of the three lane car deck alone is 52.60m. These two ferries make over 50 crossings per day serving the joint population of Yell, Unst and Fetlar of about 1,500. (Unst and Fetlar is served by two other ferries to Yell). Owing to this provision of ferries, island commuting has been a reality in Shetland for years. The whole council-owned and

operated inter-island ferry fleet now make around 70,000 crossings each year and carry around 750,000 passengers serving a total of nine islands - I don't think that anybody in the early days would have forecasted this quantity of traffic. Malcolm Jamieson



### 'Don't dump child allowance, increase it'

THE future of the child allowance is under consideration by the government.

A questionnaire on the allowance and how it is spent was sent to parents by graduate Claire Kilmartin at the request of councillors. They have been examining the rationale behind the allowance and say they will take in to consideration the way the money is used in making further decisions about it.

Councillor Mike Summers said many parents use the allowance to help with child care and, therefore, the idea of child care vouchers may be investigated. He commented, "They perhaps have some relevance in child care, where some kind of exchange between cash payment and vouchers might be appropriate."

One pre-schooler's parent told Penguin News she felt child care vouchers would be "useless" to parents with children of school age and added, "...the expense does not stop when they walk through the school gate."

She felt the allowance did not represent the actual cost of living. "As your child gets older, yes they are out of nappies and off the formula but then starts the swimming, clubs and social life that you want your child to take part in.

"Health is vital, sport and healthy eating is essential for our children's growth and preferred way of life, unfortunately in the Falklands these two things are possibly the most expensive to obtain."

Another parent felt vouchers could be acceptable to some parents with young children but said they would be of no use to parents with older children.

She too felt the allowance should be increased: "It barely covers two day's food shopping for an average sized family - and it is the cost of food in the Falklands that is the problem - there are no cheap alternatives.

"In UK you can buy good basic meat and vegetables cheaply but that's no longer an option here. In fact why doesn't FIG consider child allowance and child vouchers and subsidising the cost of fresh fruit and vegetables?"

The allowance is being reviewed now simply because it hasn't been reviewed for years. Cllr Summers explained. It is important, he said, to see whether the original rationale behind it remains valid. "It isn't clear that what we have been doing in the past is the best thing for the future, he said.

"I can't really prejudge what the final recommendations will be but it should be clear to anybody in our society that we want to make sure that the children of the least well off families are not put at risk."

### Patrick and Steve check out Games bidders

FALKLANDS representatives are getting the chance to have a close look at the cities bidding to host the 2014 Commonwealth Games.

Early this month, the Chairman of the Falkland Islands Overseas Games Association (FIOGA), Patrick Watts, visited Glasgow and next month Vice-Chairman. Steve Dent, heads to Abuja in Nigeria.

Each country's Commonwealth Games Association is invited by the bidding cities to send their Chairman or his delegate, on an all-expenses paid visit, to view the prospective venues, check out the proposed games village and question their organising team on all aspects of their bid, to ascertain if they are capable of hosting the Games. Patrick undertook the same task with New Delhi and Hamilton, Ontario four years ago before Delhi were awarded the Games.

At the conclusion of the visits, Patrick and Steve will produce reports for the other FIOGA members to look over and assess.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth Games Federation takes place in Sri Lanka in November and that is when all 72 CGAs will vote on which of the two bidding cities they prefer. "It's amazing that it is 'one country - one vote' so our vote is as important as Australia's or England's." Patrick commented.

FIOGA will meet in late October and decide then which of the two candidate cities they will vote for at the General Assembly.

While unwilling to divulge the full contents of his paper until he has reported back to FIOGA, Patrick did reveal Glasgow plans to use three of its recently refurbished football stadiums should they win the bid. They also plan to build a games village next to Celtic Park and to invite a young person from each Commonwealth country to attend the Games.



# Stanley Town Plan Review - what are your views on the issues and options? by Environmental Planning Officer, Andrea Wright

### **INTRODUCTION**

The Stanley Town Plan is intended to guide the future development of Stanley in a way which maintains a healthy and safe community life, encourages continued economic prosperity and respects and enhances environmental assets

The current Stanley Town Plan was adopted in 2004 (available for reference at the Environmental Planning Department and the Library and online at www.fidp.horizon.co.fk)

It is considered that a comprehensive review of the Plan is now needed to guide development for the next 10-15 years.

This will ensure that sufficient housing land is brought forward to provide for the future housing needs of Stanley and will address a number of other issues including industrial land provision and the town centre.

Your views are now sought on the land use planning issues for Stanley over the next 10-15 years.

# **HOUSING - CURRENT SITES**

The current plan shows housing sites in the following locations:-

- East of Stanley Services (South of Airport Road)
- Darwin Road West (now known as Sapper Hill Road West)
- Dairy Paddock (West of Dairy Paddock Road and South of Davis Street) • Old Oil Depot (Ross Road East)
- · Bennetts Paddocks (South of Ross Road West and West of Beaver Road) · Racecourse Area, subject to the relocation of the racecourse

White Space



# INDUSTRIAL/COMMERCIAL LAND

There are identified commercial areas which are suitable for shops, offices and customer services at:-

• Hillside (also a business park)

Lookout Industrial Estate (also a business park)

Kiel Canal Road

There is a lack of availability of land for offices, shops and customer service uses. Possible additional sites are:-

South of Kiel Canal Road (south of FIDF and Lookout Lodge)

· South west corner of Gordon Lines to the east and/or west of FIPASS Road immediately north of Airport Road (currently shown as industrial areas)

Gordon Lines is shown as the main area for larger scale industry and warehousing. The current boundaries of the site include the existing industrial area plus areas for future expansion to the east and south. It also includes some land to the west of FIPASS Road immediately north of Airport Road.



Is the boundary of the Central Stanley commercial area appropriate?

Should white land south of Kiel Canal Road be identified for commercial use?

Should land east and/or west of FIPASS Road immediately north of Airport Road be identified for commercial rather than industrial use?

Is there sufficient industrial land to meet likely needs over the next 10-15 years?

What other sites might be appropriate for commercial or industrial development?

### **TOWN CENTRE**

The town centre has great potential. There is the opportunity for the centralisation of Government Offices within it to provide a focal point. A possible site for this is Stanley House. It would result in the relocation of the hostel. Another issue is the need for a new site for the Infant and Junior School which is outgrowing its site.

Should Government Offices be centralised on a town centre site or perhaps the current site of the fire station with the fire station being re-located to Sapper Hill Road?

Would Stanley House be an appropriate site for this?

Should Stanley House hostel be relocated to the BFF1 site (Haskard Rise area)?

Should the Infant and Junior School be relocated to the BFFI site (Haskard Rise area)?



# **OTHER ISSUES**

There is currently land reserved for a new road from Stanley Bypass and Sapper Hill Road to Jeremy Moore Avenue. Should this be road link be located further west to link direct to

Moody Brook Road? Land on the north side of Ross Road East and Ross Road West/Moody Brook Road is currently shown as public greenspace but it does not extend as

far west as John Biscoe Road or beyond.

Should the greenspace apply to private land and extend all the way along Ross Road West and Moody Brook Road as far as the Plan bound-

The above are considered to be the main issues but there may be others which you think may need to be addressed. Are there any other land use policy issues which the Town Plan **Review should address?**







# Wool market report for week ending August 24, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices decreased at the fine end of the micron spectrum at sales in Australia and New Zealand last week but increased for broader wools.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table price falls for fleece wool lots finer than 24 micron were between 5 and 10 pence per kilogram clean while lots broader than 24 micron generally increased by a penny or two per kilogram clean.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down approximately 4 p/kg clean at 378.5 p/kg clean compared to the previous weeks closing level of 382.2 pence per kilogram clean.

Quite widespread buying interest was reported from Australian, South African and New Zealand markets during the week.

In a healthy sign for the wool market over the next several months, increased buying interest was reported from Chinese processors as well as key European top makers.

Currency issues and reduced wool supply remain as important issues for the world's wool markets.

In Australia last week 93% of the 42,840 bales offered to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 3,592 bales of crossbred wool of which 95 % were sold. In South Africa 96% of the 15,000 bales available for sale were sold while strong results were also reported from New Zealand. Next week approximately

58,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in Australia and New Zealand. Note:



# Kiwi nabs tourism job

THINGS are looking up for the Falkland Islands Tourist Board (FITB) following the appointment of New Zealander Jake Downing as General Manager

With 10 years experience in the tourism industry, Mr Downing's previous roles have included Sales Manager for a niche travel agent/ tour operator in the UK, where he led his department to become the fastest growing division of the company

Looking forward to his new job, Mr Downing commented, "I can see a lot of potential for the Falkland Islands tourism industry, and am very excited about arriving and working together with local and international businesses to build and develop the tourism figures.

FITB Chairman, Councillor Ian Hansen, said he is, "...very pleased," that the Board has finally appointed a General Man-ager and, "...looking forward to the continued growth and development of the Falkland Islands tourism industry, led by Mr Downing.

# Weekly Lan drops

Friday, September 7, 2007

THE weekly Lan flight to the Falklands will no longer stop in Puerto Montt.

The flight will continue to operate every week via Punta Arenas and also via Rio Gallegos once a month in each direction

For the month of September only the flight will operate to the Falklands at the slightly later times of arrival at 5.55pm and departure at 7:05pm.

From October 6 Lan will depart Santiago at 8.20am and arrive in the Falklands at 2.05pm. The return flight will depart the Falklands at 3.05pm and arrive into Santiago at 9.05pm.

Jennie Forrest of Lan agents International Tours and Travel commented, "Passengers will notice variations of one hour on these flight times during the period until mid-October when we have a time difference (+1 hour) with Chile."

Passengers travelling to and from Puerto Montt can connect with other flights in Punta Arenas but same day connections will not be available every Saturday, she added.

Mrs Forrest said Lan had made the change to the flight for, "operational reasons."

### *Tamar* awaiting repair

THE coastal shipping vessel Tamar FI is temporarily out of action.

While departing from Stanley on August 30 she suffered a mechanical breakdown as she crossed the Harbour but managed to return to the East Jetty

Replacement parts and an engineer are due to arrive in the Islands tomorrow and it is hoped the repairs will be completed by early next week.

The vessel will then carry out some urgent deliveries before heading to Chile for routine dry dock. Meanwhile the Ministry of De-fence-chartered St Brandon is helping with the delivery of fuel.



# Tongan fisherman is lucky South Georgia tagger

THE end of the season for the South Georgia toothfish fishery last month has led to the annual arrival in Stanley of a small fleet of longliners.

All of the licensed vessels in the fishery are required by the South Georgia Government to undertake end of season catch verification inspections as well as Marine Stewardship Council chain of custody inspections. This provided the opportunity for a presentation to one lucky fisherman

South Georgia Government's Executive Officer, Richard McKee, explains: "During the course of the season, fisheries observers tag and return live fish on every vessel.

"This is a key element of the stock assessment for the fishery and therefore every fisherman who subsequently returns a tag from a re-captured fish is rewarded with \$10 and the opportunity to win \$1,000 from an annual prize draw."

IN HIS letter which provoked much public debate last month. Mike Forrest rightly pointed out that the 2007/8 Budget announcement became somewhat lost in the 25th anniversary commemorations. However, the government should be under no illusion that it all passed by unnoticed.

The move to increase taxation, which appeared to be a knee jerk reaction to the low surplus forecast, certainly hasn't gone unheeded and the Chamber of Commerce Council has written to councillors expressing its concern.

A spokesperson this week told me, "The Chamber believes that increased tax revenues should come about by growth of the private sector and not by raising tax rates which will be detrimental to that growth." They will be meeting with councillors to discuss the issues in early October.

I recently took a look back at the introduction of the new tax policy in 2003, which was heralded as the beginning of a new era for the Falklands.

In Legislative Council's December meeting that year, the Financial Secretary explained that the tax policy review had established a framework of six main guiding principles: "Consistency, simplicity, fairness, transparency, efficiency and international competitiveness."

One has to question how exactly increasing tax without warning fits in with these principles.

How can businesses be expected to confidently plan for future expansion when they witness what appears to be unstable behaviour by the government?

AT LAST we have a General Manager for the Tourist Board. OK, so he's not actually here yet, but he *has* signed on the dotted line. I wish Jake Downing well in his new job; heaven knows it won't be an easy one and the Falklands tourism industry is renowned for its challenges.

I hope the FITB directors and the government will not view Mr Downing's appointment as the solution to everyone's problems. He will likely need a good six months to settle in (always required when an overseas applicant takes up such an integral position) and I worry that some feel the woes which have dogged FITB over recent years will fall aside as soon as his feet hit the ground.

The battle for funding is likely to be one of his biggest challenges and one I do not envy him. It may come as a bit of a shock to find that the tourism industry, instead of being a recognised sustainable industry bringing economic benefit to all and having money literally thrown at it by the government - as is the case in many parts of the world - has to fight to justify its budget.

This despite so many people deeming tourism the Falkland's strongest hope for future economic success.

# Education restructure begins



THE restructuring of the Education Department is to go ahead following approval from Executive Council (ExCo).

An Assistant Director of Education will be appointed for two years to help implement the policy changes the restructuring brings.

During their meeting last month ExCo held detailed discussions and debate about the proposals for restructuring put to them by Director of Education, Barbara Booth.

Following consultation with Education staff, some of the proposals have changed from those originally put to teachers a year ago.

According to a government statement released this week, concerns were expressed about there being too many management posts proposed under the new structure and that issues regarding non-contact time needed to be addressed. Non-contact time is a period during the school day when teachers are not allocated a class to teach on the timetable. This time is used for lesson planning, marking and assessment of student progress. It is also used for curriculum development and the monitoring and assessment of learning and teaching.

The government statement reads, "Taking account of all the points which have been raised during the process so far, and bearing in mind the original objective to improve the quality of education and adult education and pupil achievement, Executive Council were not minded to accept the proposal as it stood. "In order to find an appropri-

"In order to find an appropriate long term solution, Executive Committee required further research and information into aspects of teaching and learning which had not as yet been addressed."

These areas were:

• Comparison of teachers and non-teaching contractual hours with other Government employees:

• Comparisons of non-contact time with the UK provision;

• Comparisons of teachers' pay and conditions with the UK;

· Explore how a provision akin

to Advanced Skills teachers might be secured for the Islands; and • The role and remit of Learn-

ing Support Assistants.

Executive Council also reportedly requested that long term facilities for primary education be investigated

### Restructuring begins

Despite the requirements for further work, the restructuring process is moving forward. An Assistant Director of Edu-

An Assistant Director of Education is to be appointed on a two year contract to support the Director in carrying out the policy changes needed for the restructuring and Camp Education is to be merged with the Infant and Junior School.

Within the new unified management structure for Camp Education and the Infant and Junior School, there will now be one Headteacher. A Deputy Headteacher position will be created for this "new configuration," according to the government. "This post will need to manage the curriculum organisation of Camp but should also create capacity within the school as a whole, the oversight of Stanley Hostel being within the remit of the Assistant Director."

Does this merger spell the end for Camp Education? Director of Education, Barbara Booth, says not. "The management of Camp Education is merging with the Infant and Junior School, but the service delivery will remain unchanged. Currently there are approximately 20 children in Camp and as such it is hard, at this time, to justify a Headteacher to manage that small a number of pupils."

She says the curriculum on offer for both Camp and the Infant and Junior School are the same - "both are of a good standard" and the merger will "strengthen the existing links" between the Camp and Stanley, "...and share the undoubted good practice that there is in both units more widely."

No job losses are envisaged under the restructuring, Mrs Booth added.

# Keep an eye out for turkeys



TURKEY vultures are frequent visitors to Stanley, especially in winter, and it is easy for them to go almost unnoticed as a normal part of the scenery. Perched on roofs or roosting in trees we often pay them little attention. However over the last few weeks a number of yellow wing-tagged birds have appeared.

In mid-August visiting scientists Keith Bildstein and Marc Bechard, from Hawk Mountain Sanctuary, wing-tagged 16 turkey vultures at Eliza Cove with numbered yellow tags. This work is part of a larger programme run by Falklands Conservation to study turkey vultures and Johnny Rooks funded by the Falkland Islands Government Environmental Studies Budget and Edinburgh Zoo. The tagging will show the distances that turkey vultures can travel through the year and where they move each night. Falklands Conservation is keen to hear from anybody that has seen the obvious yellow tagged birds.

"A lot of people have reported their sightings to Falklands Conservation and we are hugely grateful. However, speaking to people whilst out and about it is obvious that many more people have spotted birds but not called them in, either because they did not get the number or assumed that others would do it," said Director of Conservation Grant Munro.

"Every sighting is valuable and of use, even if it is not possible to read the number. Just a date, time and location is enough to be of use," he added.

Additionally whether the tag was on the bird's left or right wing can help. For those that are interested, and will not cause an accident by suddenly stopping when they spot a bird there is a form available on which sightings can be reported with columns for the date, time, wing, tag No, observer, location and activity. But any sighting is welcomed.

"This is not just for people in town," stressed Mr Munro. "One bird has already made it to Fitzroy and sightings in Camp are even more important in determining how far the birds may roam."

### Father's worry over lack of apprenticeships

A STANLEY father has become so concerned about what he sees as a lack of training and job opportunities for youngsters, he has written to councillors.

Leon Mitchell says his teenage son, who has recently left school, is keen to embark upon an apprenticeship in carpentry but none are available.

He is worried this lack of opportunities for his son and others will lead to increased underage drinking and unplanned pregnancies because teenagers, with no work to do, will simply take to the streets.

Mr Mitchell told *Penguin News*, "My boy can't get anywhere at the moment; he wants to take on a trade but the money doesn't seem to be there for apprenticeships. I'm worried that in the future we'll end up with no trained people to work."

He cited the abattoir and wind farm as projects in which young people should be encouraged to be involved.

In his letter to councillors he asked, "How many apprenticeships are presently in place for electricians who could work at the wind farm? How many youngsters do we have out at the abattor training for a recognised qualification? Would you prefer to bring in outside butchers and see our youngsters having more and more problems finding employment?"

Mr Mitchell believes qualified tradespeople are dwindling. He told councillors, "Constantly we hear about looking to the future; let's see you put our tax payers money where your mouths are and get a system running where our own children have a bright future."

### Racecourse saga progresses 'satisfactorily'

MATTERS are "progressing satisfactorily" with the future of Stanley Racecourse, a meeting of the Lands Committee was told yesterday.

Prior to the last meeting of the committee at the beginning of the month, Chairman Councillor Richard Davies had met with various horse owners who felt it is desirable that the racecourse kept in its current location in town. It was agreed that as a matter of urgency a meeting would be arranged between Cllr Davies, the Environmental Planning Officer (EPO), Chief Executive Chris Simpkins and Roger Spink as representative of the company that own the land.

EPO Andrea Wright reported to the meeting that matters were progressing "satisfactorily."

# Penguin News, September 7, 2007 New guidelines introduced for use of PIP funds

ADDITIONAL guidelines for the use of Pasture Improvement Programme (PIP) funds were discussed and approved by the Agricultural Advisory Committee on Wednesday.

Agronomist Andrew Pollard told the meeting that on many occasions crop and pasture failure is attributed to adverse seasonal conditions, adding that while this may sometimes be the case it is often exacerbated by poor site selection and the utilisation of low fertility acidic soils.

Ideally, for farmers to select a lower risk site for pasture improvement, there needs to be a foot of soil on top of clay. Water needs to be available for stock and some form of shelter available both for animals and seedlings/plants which are vulnerable to the prevailing westerly winds. A north facing slope, drainage and easy access are also important, said Mr Pollard.

Farms that fail to meet primary or secondary soil testing/site selec-tion will be required to "keep looking" for suitable ground if cropping or pasture works are intended, he advised the committee, adding that the Department of Agriculture (DoA) is currently researching other opportunities for those farmers who cannot meet the requirements in the form of protein supplementation via lupins and managed grazing of native pasture.

Any sites with soil that tests below pH 4.6 will be rejected immediately, said Mr Pollard, who explained that various reports suggest that the average Falklands soil has a pH of 4.6 while it is a fundamental concept that the majority of plant spe-

Changes will be implemented into the 2008/09 PIP planning requirements on uncultivated ground. Other cases are to be dealt with on a case by case basis at the discretion of the Agricultural Advisor, Agronomy.

### AI and ET

With some £55,000 budgeted this year for genetics, recommendations to give viable animals receiving AI and ET the best possible chance of survival, and therefore a return on the government investment in farm genetics, were discussed and approved.

All ewes in the programme should have individual tag numbers and selection should be based on characteristics working to achieve the farm breeding objectives. All ewes artificially inseminated should

have a body weight of over 40kg and scanning should be undertaken to determine the percentage that is pregnant to allow management decisions to be based on animal pregnancy status, said Agricultural Advisor Peter Johnson.

Committee member Paul Robertson flagged up concerns that if guidelines become too restrictive there is a danger that people will be put off using the programme, a view that he has had put to him by some farmers already, he said.

Senior Agricultural advisor Neil Judd said the vision is not that all farms will create this standard of breeding programme but that there will be a core group of breeders that other farmers will, "...feed off in different ways.

The idea that genetic improve-

ments might take longer if this was the case was dismissed by DoA members who said that, in fact, improvements could be quicker because of improved selection methods.

### Staffing

Steve Pointing is to return to the post of Senior Veterinary Officer (SVO) with the Department of Agriculture when Vic Epstein completes his contract in January 2008. Steve was SVO prior to Vic taking up the post and has been working for DEFRA in the UK since he left the Islands.

Senior Agricultural Advisor Neil Judd ends his contract in November and Australian Mac McArthur has been appointed to this post. He will arrive in the Islands with his wife Felicity in early November and has many years experience in agricul-ture, Director of Agriculture Phyl Rendell told the advisory committee

Mr McArthur's career to date includes working as General Manager at the department of Primary Industries in Brisbane, Queensland, where he was responsible for sheep and beef extension livestock industries and he has worked for the private sector as an agricultural consultant and then as Executive Policy Officer for an Australian Lot Feeders Association.

Meanwhile recruitment is ongoing for an Agricultural Advisor

Mrs Rendell paid tribute to Nyree Heathman who has been instrumental in the setting up and running of AI and ET programmes around the Islands. Nyree leaves next month having completed six years with the department

# Praise for young students' achievements

THE achievements of the pupils and staff at the Infant and Junior School and Camp Education in their Key Stage tests are "excellent," according to the Director of Education.

Both sets of results are above the UK national average and, Barbara Booth says, provide a good foundation for future learning and achievement. "The quality of learning and teaching to achieve these standards of attainment should be recognised and acknowledged."

Year Two pupils have received the results of the Key Stage One tests and they have done well.

Key Stage One assessments test the skills which are fundamental to making good progress in future learning, Mrs Booth explained, and are a combination of teacher assessment and tests.

Pupils are expected to attain Level Two in Year Two; 97% of them achieved this in Speaking and Listening and Mathematics, 91% in Reading, 94% in Writing and 100% in Science. In every area the Falklands average percentile is at least ten points higher than the UK average.

As for Key Stage Two, the Year Six pupils should, "...rightly be proud," of the standards of attainment they have achieved in their standard assessment tests. Mrs Booth says.

"These tests are externally set and externally marked and are designed to assess pupils achievements against the expected levels of attainment for their age group." Year Six pupils are expected to achieve a Level Four in English. Mathematics and Science unless they have known and recorded special educational needs.

The results of the 23 students who sat the Key Stage Two tests are shown in the table below (Fig 1).

Mrs Booth commented. "It can be seen that all of these results are above the UK national average for the percentage attainment at Key Stage Two. Even more pleasing is the percentage of children, over a third in each subject area, who achieved Level 5 which is above the age expected attainment."

She added, "Both pupils and staff are to be applauded and congratulated on these excellent results both in Key Stage One and Two."

Q IN the August 24 edition of Penguin News, Cllr Summers is quoted as telling a public meeting, "...it we wanted to set a surplus of three million, I think we could. Nobody would like it very much but we could do it."

Could Cllr Summers please explain in detail how he would do it?

A Councillor Summers replied, "Setting a surplus of three million is not an immediate priority, and therefore there is not a current detailed plan as to how precisely it should be done.

"However a previous zero based budgeting exercise set out a strategy demonstrating how this could be approached and how it might be achieved.

achieved. "To achieve a surplus of £3 million would require reductions in recurrent expenditure, in transfer payments and in capital works (thus allowing reductions from the recurrent budget to the capital equalization fund). This could be assisted by revenue side measures, though this is unlikely to be favoured in times of overall expenditure reduction.

of overall expenditure reduction. "The government's balance sheet continues to grow, along with GDP, showing a healthy economy with plenty of options and opportunities. Government's economic strategy will continue to underpin this strength."


PRESIDENT Hugo Chavez of Venezuela has threatened Britain with "revenge" for the Falklands war, reports Martin Arostegui for the Sunday Times this week

In what the journalist refers to as a, "new outburst of anti-western sabre-rattling," the Latin American leftist warned last week that his recent build-up of sophisticated Russian and Iranian weapons would be used to destroy the British fleet if it attempted to return to the South Atlantic

Speaking on his weekly television show Alo Presidente (Hello Mr President) Chavez denounced what he described as Britain's, "illegal occupation" of the Falklands and repeated his call for a regional military alliance against Britain and the United States.

"If we had been united in the last war, we could have stopped the old empire," Chavez said, as he pointed to maps showing how Venezuelan aircraft and submarines would intercept British warships. "Today we could sink the British fleet." said the president.

The Sunday Times reports that Chavez has often expressed support for Argentina's claim to the Falklands, but his latest broadside was notable for both its anti-British vitriol and its unprecedented threats. He declared that British history was, "...stained with the blood of South America's indigenous people," and demanded re-





venge for the, "cowardly sinking" of the Argentine ship General Belgrano in 1982.

Western diplomats have long grown used to harangues from Chavez, but US and British officials have reportedly become more concerned by his willingness to lavish billions of dollars from Venezuela's soaring oil income on military capabilities.

A spokesperson for Government House declined to comment on Mr Chavez's interview.

On his TV programme, Chavez introduced a group of 30 Venezuelan pilots who were trained in Russia to fly a squadron of 24 Sukhoi SU-30 multi-role fighters. The aircraft were part of a £3 billion armaments deal with Moscow.

Chavez has also bought 100,000 AK-47 assault rifles and negotiated to set up a Kalishnikov factory in Venezuela. He has reportedly ordered nine Russian diesel submarines, including the cruise missilecarrying 677E Amur-class vessel.

US officials also fear that Chavez may be seeking nuclear technology from his contacts with Iran and North Korea, reports the Sunday Times. He is discussing a possible joint programme with Tehran to build an unmanned drone aircraft similar to the American Predator and has long been engaged in a regional attempt to promote military cooperation against the USA.

# Chavez threatens Britain with 'revenge' Longliner fined for illegal fishing in Saint Helena

THE owners and charterers of a ship caught illegally fishing in St Helena waters have been fined.

Argos Oceanic Ltd and Armadora Pereira pleaded guilty in London to charges brought by DEFRA on the U-registered vessel Swordbridge of fishing without the necessary licenses issued by the relevant UK authorities, failing to complete an EU catch logbook and failing to complete an EU landing declaration.

Argos Oceanic Ltd is a branch of the Argos Group which has fishing interests in a number of regions, including the Falklands and South Georgia.

Fishing News International reported the case in its September edition.

The Swordbridge was owned and registered under the British flag in the British Overseas Territory of St Helena by the Company Argos Oceanic Limited. The vessel was bareboat chartered to the company Armadora Pereira; it remained under the British flag and on the St Helena Register but for the period of the charter was transferred to the UK Register.

According to a statement from Argos Oceanic Ltd. whilst waiting to obtain licences under the UK bareboat registration, the vessel applied for, was awarded and paid for licences from the St Helena Government to fish for swordfish and other pelagic species in St Helena waters. "A St Helena Government ICAAT Fishing Catch Logbook was completed and submitted for the campaign and the required ICAAT landing declaration was made to the Namibian Authorities countersigned by the St Helena Authorities.

The vessel was fitted with a UK vessel monitoring system

which was operational during the entire campaign and DEFRA was contacted before the vessel sailed to advise them that the vessel was heading to St Helena to carry out fishing operations under a St Helena Government issued license.

The company says that four months after the vessel sailed from port to carry out the fishing campaign (and after the campaign had ended) DEFRA noted from their monitoring system that the vessel had been operating in St Helena waters. "This was despite the yessel reporting every two hours to DEFRA during the fishing campaign.

Argos Oceanic Ltd insists there was no deliberate attempt by the vessel to fish without the correct permits, "...rather that the operators had not been aware that UK/ EU permits and reports were required in addition to the permits and documentation required by the St Helena Government.

In court, the owners and operators accepted that the law required the vessel to hold UK-1ssued licenses in addition to those obtained from the Government of St Helena and therefore pleaded guilty to the charges and expressed regret that they had not amended the charter and reverted to the St Helena Registry for the fishing campaign.

The court accepted that the vessel had completed all necessary St Helena paperwork and had cooperated fully with the investigation

The vessel owners, Argos Oceanic Ltd. were fined a total of £10,000, the charterers. Armadora Pereira, were fined a total of £60,000 and £5,105 of costs were awarded to DEFRA.

### Two feeble cheers for new airbridge

IN THE light of the grim reality that further air links with the continent of South America are unlikely to be possible while the Argentine government maintains its current ban on both charter flights and a mid-week LAN flight, it was cheering some months back to hear that FIG, the British Government and the MOD were in serious talks about improving the direct flight from Britain and making it more civilian and business friendly.

Among the topics mentioned as being 'on the table' was the use of a more accessible commercial airport at the British end. Anyone connected with the tourism industry would also have expected to see the possibility of changes to the quota system for civilian passengers explored; this at present makes advance booking for anything more than a handful of passengers a lottery

Other topics that it was reasonable to assume were discussed were: making booking for the air bridge easier, a review of the fare structure, the possibility of changing the route to connect with commercial air hubs in Brazil or Uruguay, and generally a change of culture from the present attitude that civilian passengers are a nuisance to be treated as SLF or self-loading freight The list, while not endless, could be longer because so much needs to change before the MOD flight can be regarded as a tool for economic development, capable of making up for the damage to our commercial development caused - deliberately no doubt - by Mr Kirchner.

So, after some months when anyone who asked was told that the talks were progressing, "... in a positive manner." what have we achieved, other than allowing the oldest Boeing 747 still in the air to have a well-earned rest?

The answer, according to a recent Mercopress report, which had me shouting at my laptop, is twelve business class seats. This seems to me to be both totally inadequate from a developmental point of view and - if our councillors had anything to do with it - politically inept, offering yet more fuel to the argument that having got rid of one rul-ing class in the Falklands, we have been busy ever since creating a new one

Don't get me wrong, I have flown business class and loved every minute of it, but part of the pleasure is not just the fact you can get a good night's sleep, real food with real cutlery and better entertainment. No, the real deep and lasting pleasure comes from the fact that while someone is carefully hanging up your jacket and offering a choice of champagne or a pisco sour to kick the journey off with, a couple of hundred other people are still being herded into their relatively cramped and uncomfortable quarters at the back of the plane. The real pleasure then comes from feeling - on however temporary a basis - part of an elite.

One of the good things about the MOD flight is that, give or take the odd front row given over to some VIP visitor or local bigwig, it is more or less democratic. Everybody has the same chance of either finding themselves with three seats in which to stretch out, or jammed all night in the middle of a row of sleeping squaddies and unable to get out to the toilet. To continue this admirable tradition and to avoid any suspicion that the provision of twelve business class seats may have been negotiated by the very folk who hope to occupy them, may I humbly suggest that they are allocated for each flight on a random or 'lottery' basis. 

# A crossing with a difference...



AN RAF Tornado pilot from Mount Pleasant has become the first person to kite surf across Falkland Sound.

Flight Lieutenant Duncan 'Deano' Dean is a kite surf expert, a relatively new sport where the surfer can reach speeds of up to 30 miles per hour and leap as high as 30 feet in the air in strong gusts.

When Deano suggested one evening that kite surfing across the Sound had not been done before and would be a real challenge, his navigator. Flight Lieutenant Wayne Smith, threw down the gauntlet, offering to support him as his campaign manager. The pair then set about planning the adventure, deciding to raise as much money as possible for Combat Stress and Macmillan Cancer Support charities.

On Thursday, August 23, Deano set off from Poke Point

near Port Howard on West Falkland in a 25 mile per hour wind and choppy seas, hotly pursued by a safety boat manned by John Colquboun of VT Communications and Officer Commanding 1435 Flight, Squadron leader Dave Gourlay.

Deano completed the 11 mile crossing, arriving at Newhaven on East Falkland a mere 45 minutes later and without enduring any major wipe-outs.

At one point he was visited by a Tornado of 1435 Flight and towards the end of the crossing. Squadron Leader John Sheldon of 78 Squadron took the opportunity to practise rescue winching on and off the safety boat with one of his Sea King helicopters.

At the end of the day Deano had achieved the first ever kite surf across Falkland Sound and had raised over £600.

### Footballer Daniel heads from Swindon to the States

TALENTED footballer Daniel Allan, son of Falkland Islander Terry, is heading to the USA on an academic/football scholarship.

The 19 year old from Swindon has been offered a four year scholarship at Hiwassee Junior College in Tennessee.

After two years he will have the option to transfer to a bigger college or university, where he will continue to play football alongside his studies.

Following a trial match held in Surrey, in February Daniel was invited on a ten-day tour to North Carolina and he served as team captain. This, he said, made people take notice of him.

He told the Swindon Advertiser, "I was feeling fresh, and the adrenaline was pumping at the opening match against Wingate College. I had my best game of the tour and afterwards the Hiwassee coach, Walter Liszenski, said he wanted me to join them next season.

## Falklands' rock completes Welsh 25th anniversary memorial



THE foundations for the Welsh National Monument to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the Falkland Islands conflict have been completed.

The monument is dedicated to, "The sons of Wales and elsewhere, who paid the ultimate price when restoring freedom and democracy to the Falkland Islands."

It will be officially consecrated during a national commemorative event on Sunday, September 30, Last week the final foundations

Last week the final foundations for the monument were put in place at Alexandra Gardens by the First Minister for Wales. Rhodin Morgan and the Deputy Leader of Cardiff Council Judith Woodman, accompanied by representatives of the South Atlantic Medal Association who are organising the events. Veterans of the conflict also

Veterans of the conflict also winessed the final foundations being laid ahead of the mounting of the rock. The 14ft high rock weighs five tonnes and was presented to the Welsh Veterans by Falkland Islanders. It travelled more than 8,000 miles from Mount Harriet, the scene of intense action on the evening of June 11, 1982. The rock will be the centrepiece of the monument which will carry the names of British and Falkland Islanders who lost their lives.

First Minister Rhodri Morgan commented. "It is right that in the 25th Anniversary year of the Falklands conflict, a permanent national memorial to those who lost their lives, is constructed here in Wales, particularly as many of the families who lost their loved ones in the conflict came from Wales.

"This monument will ensure that the efforts and sacrifices made by Welsh men and women are remembered, and I am immensely proud to have been asked to finish laying the foundations for this magnificent memorial."

Deputy Leader of Cardiff Council Judith Woodman said she was "honoured" to have been asked to help finish the foundations for the monument which she described as, "...a testimony to the sacrifice and bravery of those who fought and of their loved ones."

The events are being organised by the South Atlantic Medal Association, with the support of the Welsh Assembly Government and Cardiff Council.



# Volunteers clean up bay, ready for penguins' return








MAGELLANIC penguins who are soon due to return to their burrows at Hadassa Bay have a clutter-free home waiting for them, thanks to the efforts of a team of volunteers at the weekend.

The group filled two trailers with rubbish they had collected from the shore, in a beach clean organised by Falklands Conservation.

The charity regularly holds these 'community clean ups' and this time chose Hadassa Bay because of its proximity to Stanley and the fact it is home to magellanic (or jackass) penguins and other breeding birds.

Anna Shepherd of Falklands Conservation said a considerable amount of debris had accumulated in the area that the penguins use for breeding so the charity decided to clean the beach before the birds returned from sea in the spring.

"Hadassa Bay is a National Nature Reserve and it is important to help look after these important areas for wildlife," Anna explained.



She added, "It is hoped that the beach will remain free from debris for some time, providing a much more pleasant environment for the birds and also for the people who regularly walk along that area of coastline."

The rubbish collected ranged from driftwood and plastics (bottles and bags) to food packaging. drink cans, nets, rope and many, many cotton buds. Broken glass was also picked up off the bank above the beach.

Anna thanked everyone who turned up to help, adding, "Thank you too to Hay and Sam Miller and Brian and Judy Summers for the trailers and Sealer PR for the tea and coffee."

She added that Falklands Conservation is happy to hear suggestions for where the next community clean should be held.

"If anyone has any suggestions of an area of beach or common that they think could benefit from being cleaned, then please give us a ring."

I FINISHED school in the Falklands in 1994. My GCSE results were faxed through to me at a hotel in London whilst on a family holiday. It was then I realised that I would actually have to leave the Falklands.

I decided to take the standard route and headed to Winchester which was a great introduction to life in the UK; it was owing to this experience at Symonds I decided to continue on to university.

After graduating from Leeds with BSc (Hons) Information Systems in 2000, I moved to London with a couple of friends from uni where working life commenced (for a year!). My first job was for a start-up internet energy trading company. Like many start-up internet companies it didn't work out, so our entire UK side of the operation was made redundant. My first job in the UK and my first redundancy!

Luckily it coincided with my desire to travel and left me with a few weeks to relax and say my goodbyes before heading off to explore some different parts of the world.

I started travelling with four university friends covering seven countries in South East Asia before deciding to go it alone. My travels allowed me to stop off in the Falklands for a couple of months to visit friends and family and replenish finances before starting my South American leg of the tour. Travelling alone made me a much more independent person and I gained many experiences and new friends by doing so.

On returning to the UK I opted to go back to London where I found my working head again. After a couple of short term contracts I was offered a position working as a consultant at an Investment Bank where I've been Project Manager/Business Analyst for four and a half years now. The hours are long and can be stressful but I enjoy the challenge (most of the time) of implementing global systems for such a large organisation.

Just a few months ago I purchased my first property in London. It's in a nice location in between two large parks and has a great garden so I can cocoon myself away from the London madness if necessary.

I read the 'Give us two minutes' section of Penguin News every week and quite often the answer to changing one thing about the Falklands is related to location. I wouldn't necessarily want to move the Falklands, but I do struggle with the pricey flights and the length of time it takes to get home. Due to these constraints I have to plan my visits years in advance. Five years ago I planned to be home this year for the 25th Anniversary so I had to arrange every visit before and after then so I didn't end up with either a large gap in between visits or going home twice in one year.

At 17 when I moved over to the UK for the first time I never imagined I would still be in the UK. I still don't know when I'll move back home; until I do, I'm enjoying my new pad and will be happy to explore the rest of the world for the time being and continue to visit home as often as I can.

# Forrest McWhan: 'a man of tireless service to the Islands'

A tribute by the Revd Paul Charman AMONGST the many clergy who have come to the churches of the Falklands some have given very long periods of dedicated service. Interestingly, three of these have each spent over 30 years in the Islands and together they span the 88 years from 1877 to 1965.

Dean Lowther Brandon was priest at the Cathedral for 30 years. Father Mario Migone was at St Mary's for 33 years and Dr Forrest McWhan served The Tabernacle for 31 years. Their time overlapped for only a few years on each occasion: they all were heavily involved in working in the wider community.

I was asked to contribute an item on Forrest McWhan for the *Dictionary of Falklands Biography* which is being edited by David Tatham: this adapted version of the story of a truly remarkable man is now made available to readers of *Penguin News*.

I am indebted to those who provided me with much information: Rex Browning, Gladys Lee, Ernie Spencer, Trudi Felton, Carol Eynon and Edward Cannan.

The Tabernacle had been without a minister for 18 years when Forrest McWhan arrived in 1934, at just 21 years of age. The 'Tab' flourished under

The 'Tab' flourished under Forrest's dynamic leadership. He introduced many activities into the church - Sunday School, choir, prayer and Bible study groups, mothers and toddlers (this, surely, must have been one of the first in the world!) and a women's sewing group - and soon built up a healthy congregation.

He organised regular winter social evenings ('magic lantern' slide shows and variety shows). He instigated the annual bazaar to raise funds for the church: cakes and garden produce were particularly sought after in those days when such items could become scarce in the shops - you would not believe the price of a single tomato! The bazaars included suppers for sale to the general public.

Forrest also organised picnics to nearby beaches, both for church members and for people in the wider community.

The Revd Forrest McWhan was ordained a minister of The Church of Scotland in 1941 and that Church continued to support the Tab for many years.

In 1945 Forrest even took temporary charge of the Cathedral whilst there was no priest there: in fact Bishop Weller offered to ordain him an Anglican minister and give him charge of the Cathedral, but he declined.

Dr McWhan gained the degree of Doctor of Divinity in the 1950's from an American university.

Amongst the wider community of the Islands, Forrest visited the sick in the hospital every week and spent a lot of time visiting the homes of Stanley residents, irrespective of whether they were members of the Tab or any other church. He also regularly visited people in Camp either by boat and on horseback.

It was during one of these visits that he decided to walk back to Stanley from Darwin; he got lost and caused some very anxious moments. It has been said that Forrest was never the same after this incident and it seems likely that he was becoming ill with the disease from which he died shortly after.

Another story tells of him sleeping in the shearing shed on a farm on the West – he had missed the launch back to the boat and didn't want to inconvenience the farm manager, who was rather annoyed when he discovered this act of independence.

In 1944 Forrest resurrected The Falkland Islands Weekly News, and for a number of years was its editor. He wrote The Falkland Islands Today, published in 1952, a book which clearly demonstrates his knowledge and commitment to the Islands.

Dr McWhan served on the Overseas Scholarship Selection Committee, recommending those who should be sent for further education to Uruguay. In 1952 such was the high esteem in which he was held by the community that he was entrusted with the care of the first boys to be awarded a scholarship to a grammar school in Britain and travelled with them for the long sea voyage.



His work amongst young people is also demonstrated by his appointment as chaptain to The Boy's Brigade. Forrest also served on the Legislative Council where he had a special interest in the welfare of the elderly.

During World War Two he was chaplain to the Falkland Islands Defence Force, and also served as a Royal Navy chaplain and chaplain to the military garrison stationed here. He was a member of the committee which censored mail leaving the Islands.

Forrest also was well-known and greatly respected by the leaders and members of a succession of expeditions to the South Pole. He was made a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society for his contribution to the geography of the South Atlantic.

In the late 1940s Forrest's work and exceptional public service was rewarded with an MBE. In 1967 the Government named their coastal vessel M/V *Forrest* in his honour.

Nearly every day Forrest took an early morning swim in the harbour.

Forrest McWhan married Nellie Eannenga in Stanley on March 19, 1940; she was the daughter of Jessie Bartram who ran the boarding house in Ross Road East where Forrest had been lodging. Nellie and Forrest did not have any children.

On August 25, 1965, whilst on leave with Nellie in Scotland, Forrest McWhan died suddenly and was buried in his boyhood home of Duns.

For 30 years, almost the whole of his adult life. Forrest served the church and community of the Islands. He was greatly loved and respected: many people alive today can testify that he didn't try to force his religion on anyone and treated everyone equally. However, he had high standards for himself and also for his 'flock' in the Tab who knew that if they missed a Sunday service he would be round to ask why.

There are many stories about Forrest but perhaps the greatest success story is the man himself with his immense love and tireless service to all the people of the Islands.

## Wool market report for week ending August 24, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices generally slipped at sales in Australia and New Zealand last week. The exceptions were 26 micron fleece lots (remained steady) and 32 micron fleece lots (gained two pence per kilogram clean).

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, price falls were between two and 11 pence per kilogram clean.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down approximately 7 p/kg clean at 371.4 p/kg clean compared to the previous weeks closing level of 378.5 pence per kilogram clean.

Buying interest was quite widespread with a solid mix of Asian and European top makers active.

Currency issues, wool supply concern and Chinese quota restrictions remain as important issues impacting on wool markets.

In Australia last week 83% of the 48.392 bales offered to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 4.858 bales of crossbred wool of which 86 % were sold. In New Zealand 82% of the 11.688 bales available for sale were sold.

Next week approximately 70,000 bales of wool will be of-

fered for sale in South Africa. Australia and New Zealand. Note:



Do not need a fishing licence but the daily bag limit is 6 brown trout for all waterways, except for the Murrell River, which has a daily bag limit of 3 trout and each fish must weigh over 1.5lb

or 0.5kg. The native zebra trout can not be fished. The Environmental Planning Department wishes to remind fishermen that you need to ask permission before fishing on private land. On the Murrell River, you can not fish off the culverts or within 100m of the culvert crossing on either side or upstream of Drunken Rock Pass, and these areas are marked.

# Gold company to end Falklands exploration

THE company which has been prospecting for gold in the Falklands looks set to close its operation at the end of the year.

Falklands Gold and Minerals Ltd (FGML) says no deposits of economic interest have yet been found and, unless the remaining work programme identifies deposits likely to be of commercial interest, it will cease exploration activities in the Islands.

The work programme in the Falklands was designed to identify the source of alluvial gold recovered from streams. This gold is associated with a zone of tight, east-west folding which has affected the Bluff Cove and Port Sussex formations amongst other rock sequences.

The company says these formations contain favourable interbedded shales and sandstone units that could, given the correct structural taps, be favourable targets for Slate Belt type gold and in particular 'Saddle Reet' styled mineralisation. The saddle reefs are being investigated but FGML believes that these are unlikely to generate ore bodies of economic size.

Speaking from his home in South Africa, FGML Chairman Richard Linnell said he was "disappointed" nothing of interest had been found. He commented, "We've spoken to a lot of other experts to check we haven't missed anything but the fact is that the deposit is just too small..."

He added, "I'm sad my visit to the Falklands next month will be my last, unless something is found between now and Christmas."

He said doing business in the Falklands had been, "very comfortable, particularly compared to other parts of the world in which we have worked."

He paid tribute to the farmers with whom FGML has worked and to the "super administration" run by Director of Minerals, Phyl Rendell.

Mr Linnell said the Falklands exploration had been far from a waste of time. When the company ceases work here it will have cash balances of approximately £3.5 million and an experienced exploration team fully equipped with two drills and sample processing equipment.

He added, "I believe we have also added to the economic value of Goose Green and increased the international profile of the Falkland Islands."

The Board of FGML now intends to seek opportunities elsewhere in the world and says it has initially identified "gold, molybdenum and uranium" as the metals most likely of interest.

## UK policemen to 'mentor' local officers

THREE retired police officers from the UK are to spend three months in the Falklands "training and mentoring" local officers.

The move is an initiative of Inspector Len McGill with the support of the Chief Executive, the new Chief of Police said this week.

Superintendent Paul Elliot ex-

plained that the officers, who are due to arrive in the Islands on September 21 have 76 years' policing experience between them and will, "...support the existing staff, help with the training of new officers and help the force get on its feet.

"It's a short term measure to try and provide tutorship, mentorship and training..."





ALTHOUGH it is only currently running at a third of its capacity, the Sand Bay Wind Farm has already cut down the government's fuel spending by 800 to 1,000 litres each day. The third and final turbine in this first phase of the wind farm came on line on August 30. More on page 2.

## Millions for new ferry terminals?

THE cost of the terminals for the new ferry service has yet to be revealed by the government.

Estimations in excess of £1 million for each of the two terminals have been hinted at, but the Chairman of the Transport Advisory Committee, Councillor Mike Rendell, would not be drawn.

He commented, "It would be more appropriate to await the outcome of Executive Council and Standing Finance Committee before making public the details of estimates of ferry terminal construction costs."

As for a rumour about the new coastal shipping vessel, *Concordia Bay*, becoming 'swamped' during sea trials, a spokesperson for Workboat Services Ltd dismissed this as "fantasy."

She commented, "The Concordia Bay is undergoing the alterations required to comply with FIG passenger and other requirements and will be for several more months."

I WONDER how many people felt, like me, a sense of horror upon learning that a couple of the youngsters involved recently in a serious single vehicle accident were not wearing their seat belts.

On more occasions in the last three years than anyone wishes to remember the community has been rocked by the loss of young lives, arguably for this very reason. I'm sure every parent in the Islands feels a sense of dread when the news of a road accident reaches them and, with more and more youngsters being able to afford or have access to powerful 4x4 vehicles, it seems to be a more common occurrence.

It is in the nature of young people to want to experience adventure in every way possible and nothing has changed in that respect in the last thousand years. Several decades ago my age group were hooning around in vehicles too, however they were vehicles that you could just about coax 40mph out of downhill with the wind behind you and the extreme challenge was more who could drive around town successfully in a Land Rover IIA without using the clutch (no mean feat with a gearbox only synchromesh between third and fourth, believe me!) or negotiate Long Island mountain without getting bogged.

What will it take to get through to these young (and, disappointingly, some not so young) drivers, that the powerful machines they are driving are not merely expensive toys but potential death traps particularly on roads where conditions can change dramatically with the regularity of our weather?

If you are involved in an accident, a seatbelt can give you a fighting chance. The law is not in place to make life difficult, it is simply there for our own safety and that of the passengers we carry.

If it helps, when you get in your vehicle just think of that whingeing old bird down at *Penguin News...* and belt up!

THE PEOPLE behind the most exciting new project the Islands have seen in years deserve an accolade. The wind farm is now supplying clean, green electricity and hopefully signals a new direction for the Islands' approach to looking after the environment.

With what I feel was far too little fanfare, the wind farm quickly appeared on the horizon and now significantly less fossil fuels are being consumed; instead, the one commodity we have in excess is being harnessed to provide an essential element in our day to day lives.

While people tend to either love or hate the look of wind turbines, I have to confess to finding them the perfect addition to our landscape. Their somewhat stark appearance seems fitting, almost poetic, on our treeless horizons.

IT WAS bemusing to hear rumours this week that the new ferry will have to have a dedicated anti-terrorist security officer on board - it had to be a wind up.

A call to Tim Cotter at Coastal Shipping indicated there was a grain of truth in the rumour but it's not quite as bad as it first seemed - we're not going to see armed guards patrolling the *Tamar* and *Concordia Bay*.

Under International Safety of Life at Sea (SOLAS) regulations, all ships operating here now (including the *Tamar*) have to have someone on board who has taken the week-long International Ship and Port Security course.

The likelihood of an Al-Qaeda attack in Falkland Sound isn't exactly strong but it seems that - like the secure zone at the Public Jetty - we don't have much choice but to comply.



## Green projects show results

RUNNING at just a third of its capacity, the wind farm is already creating substantial savings on fuel consumption at the Power Station.

Giving an update on progress with the project managed by German company Enercon, Councillor Richard Cockwell said the three turbines at Sand Bay had come on line throughout August. While they are currently each limited to 100 kilowatt output until full automation is installed, they are producing 23% of the electricity used at night and 13% of the daytime consumption.

This alone, said Cllr Cockwell, is saving 800 to 1,000 litres of fuel per day which equates to £150 -200,000 per annum.

He said these figures are an early and conservative estimation of savings, based on data from a very short period of time and a full assessment will be made when the wind farm has been running at full capacity for 12-18 months.

There has been no effect to the power supply in town while work has been ongoing with the turbines, said Cllr Cockwell who explained that they are operating on a trial safe system where any anomaly will cause the turbines to back off completely to prevent any spikes in the power. This will not be the case once the automation is completed, he said.

The capital cost for the wind farm project is expected to be recouped over eight years, however Cllr Mike Summers said that all the assumptions have been "extremely conservative" and that theoretically it is possible they could produce 30-35% of the energy requirement by the end of the year which could reduce the payback time for the investment in the turbines.

#### Waste heat recovery

The waste heat recovery system at the Power Station has now been contributing to the Community School and the hospital heating costs for some six months and has reduced heating bills considerably for both buildings.

At Tuesday evening's public meeting, Cllr Cockwell said there

Cllr Summers assured this would not happen, as the fuel formula is not based on volume, adding that SSL were aware of fuel reductions at the Power Station and are themselves experimenting with energy saving systems in the form of solar panels, which are reported to have been used successfully at Malvina House Hotel.

#### Glass imploders

PWD Maintenance Manager George Burroughs reported that in the first four days of the imploder being in use to the rear of the Town Hall almost a ton of cullet has been removed.

Cllr Cockwell said there are many uses for the cullet in the Islands, particularly for bedding pipes as it is sometimes difficult to source suitable materials.

While the system at present is on a fairly small scale which is not likely to attract the main producers of glass such as public houses. Cllr Summers said there might be an incentive to encourage these outlets to get their own imploders in the future.

### CPO aims to restore pride in the force | Haskards celebrate golden wedding

THERE'S a new man in charge at the Police Station and he is here to put some pride back into the local force.

Superintendent Paul Elliot has been in the job for just a few days but he already has some clear aims for his job.

He is well aware of the traumatic times the police force has been through in recent years, including the prosecution and conviction of two officers and a number of investigations into bullying within the force. He commented, "I am hope-fully bringing a period of stability and would like to bring the concept of rebuilding the pride in the force. PRIDE stands for professionalism, respect for both the public and each other, integrity, dedication and en-gagement with the community to make sure we are delivering."

He adds, "I'm here to hopefully raise morale and improve the service to the customer. I'm not here to look at the history book, I'm here to look to the luture and move the force onward from its troubled period into a new time of stability."

Having served in the UK police force for 30 years. Superintendent Elliot was due to retire; however, aged just 48, he fell he was too young for retirement and instead says he is more than ready for his new challenge in the Islands.

His first task is to carry out a review of the force: "I won't come in with a rod of iron and change things for the heck of it; I need to look in a steady fashion at the current policing systems here and whether there are ways in which they can be improved." He hopes to give a presentation on how he is progressing at a public meeting in November.

Superintendent Elliot comes with experience in rural communitybased policing and he wants to see if this would bring benefits to the Islands. His three decades of polic-

ing in the eastern region of Licolnshire means he has grounding in an array of areas, from traffic policing to firearms licencing to community safety. Prevention of crime is not the

sole responsibility of the police, he believes, and must involve a joint effort from all areas of the community, from schools and churches to the council and health service: "Let's work together to enable crime to be tackled.

Superintendent Elliot is on a three year contract and is accompanied by his wife, Alison.

Other new faces Also joining the Falklands police force this week is Constable Donald Morrison, an officer with three years' experience from Ork-ney. He has a family connection with the Islands: at the turn of the 20th century his great grandfather worked here as a shepherd. The 33year-old has taken up a two year placement.

Donald is not the only new face in the Islands; a large number of people have recently arrived to take up contracts with the Falkland Islands Government.

New teachers Jennifer Sol. Wayne Wayne Thompson, Norman Valentine, Michelle Davis and headteacher Alastair Baldwin join returned teachers Mike Barton and Jane Hill at the Community School while Dominic Rowan joins the staff at the Junior School.

The new Director of Health, Kathleen Bree is now in post, along with social workers Christopher O'Malley and Margaret Scarlett. In the Justice department, the

new Attorney General, David Pickup, has been behind his desk for some weeks and Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson has already heard her first cases.

Robin Granger is the new Chief Internal Auditor at the Treasury.

#### MPA tobacco price rise not instructed by FIG

ALTHOUGH the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) has the right to raise import duty on tobacco and alcohol imported into the Islands, including by the Ministry of Defence (MoD) and their agencies, at no time was there any instruction from FIG to MoD to do so, says Councillor Mike Summers.

Falklands Radio reported the price rise in tobacco at Mount Pleasant earlier this week.

Since MoD decided to introduce a smoking ban in buildings and has taken a "strong corporate ap-proach" to the dangers of smoking, FIG has offered to assist further by raising duty, Cllr Summers ex-plained. "There is no logic (admitted by MoD) to selling cheap cigarettes whilst banning smoking. MoD declined our offer to raise duty, but in discussion agreed to equalise the

cost of tobacco in the Falklands." He added. "There had been some evidence of illegal sales of duty free into the civil community. If in future FIG agreed to substantially increase duty on tobacco this prob-lem would be exacerbated. At no time was there any instruction from FIG to MoD, this was done by agreement.

MoD are to advise FIG what use will be made of the increased revenue, since it is being used in support of defence activities in lieu of duty

#### MPA man fined for assaulting ex-girlfriend

ANDREW Dave Constantine (35), a civilian worker at Mount Pleasant has been fined after he admitted assaulting his former pariner.

Crown Counsel Julia Kraehling-Smith told the court that the couple had split up because of an earlier domestic incident.

She said that on August 10 after a visit to Stanley, Mr Constantine and Ms Brinsden had gone to her room at Mount Pleasant where they discussed their relationship and she told him that she was scared of a repeat assault happening because of the interest he still paid her.

The discussion escalated into what Ms Kraehling-Smith described as an attack; she said Mr Constantine pulled Ms Brinsden's hair, hit her around the head with an open hand

IAN Neil Leo (36) was fined after he entered a plea of guilty to assaulting Pte Darrel Paterson on August 30, in their work place on Onion Range

Ms Kraehling-Smith said Mr Leo was a cleaner on the range while Pte Paterson was a chef. An argument had broken out between them over music and later escalted in the kitchen, when Mr Leo had grabbed Pte Paterson by the throat and pushed him against the wall. She said Pte Paterson was con-

cerned for his safety and Mr Leo waved a fist around although no punch was thrown. Mr Leo later apologised to him for his actions.

Mr Leo, who did not have legal representation, said he had been at Onion Range for six years. He handed to the court letters of com-

#### Driver fined for not wearing a seatbelt

THREE people have appeared in court in the last week charged with not wearing seatbelts while in a vehicle.

On Friday, September 7, Craig Williams pleaded guilty to charges of driving without due care and attention and driving without a seatbelt.

Crown Counsel Julia Kraeylyn-Smith told the court that on Saturday, August 25 police received a 999 call reporting an accident on the MPA Road. Police found a vehicle around sixty metres north of the 'Whitby Triangle'. Ms Kraehling-Smith showed the court photos from the scene; she said that there was extensive damage to the vehicle and Mr Williams was thrown from the vehicle. In court, Mr Williams said that

he did not remember what speed he was travelling at and admitted to knowing that the passengers, along

and, by his own admission, although not recalled by Ms Brinsden, hit her on the leg.

In his statement Mr Constantine said he was "frustrated" by the way Ms Brinsden had behaved and told the court how he had received mixed messages from her leading up to the incident. "One moment she was wanting to be with me the next she didn't," he said.

she didn't, he said. Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson gave Mr Constantine credit for his cooperation and early guilty plea and described the attack as short and, to some extent, provoked by the uncertainty of the relationship.

She fined him £150 with £50 compensation to be paid to Ms Brinsden, plus £70 prosecution costs.

Also in court on Tuesday were the two youths who were in the vehicle with Mr Wiliams when it crashed. The first admitted riding in the vehicle whilst not wearing a seatbelt.

In issuing the boy with an absolute discharge from any penalty or punishment, Miss Thompson told him, "You have been extremely fortunate. This was a very serious matter and you were very lucky to walk out of it."

She said the severity of the in-cident was "punishment in itself."

The other boy entered no plea to his charge. His case was adjourned for a week.

## Conditional discharge for theft of tobacco

A STANLEY youth has received a conditional discharge after he stole two pouches of tobacco and gave it away to another teenager.

Appearing before the Senior Magistrate on Tuesday, the boy admitted charges of theft and supplying tobacco to another minor. A third charge of possessing tobacco was withdrawn.

The boy said he had found the tobacco outside the Victory Bar and took it, something he described in court as, " ... a stupid thing to do.'

He then gave one pouch to a friend who in turn tried to sell it to another boy

In delivering her sentence, Miss Thompson told the youth the seriousness of the theft charge lay not in the value of the goods but in the fact it was, "...an offence of dishonesty."

She issued a conditional discharge for one year and did not impose a separate penalty for the supply charge. The boy was ordered to pay £70 prosecution costs.

**Q** WHEN the police recover stolen property from a thief, who becomes the owner of that property?

Inspector Len McGill kindly answered this series of questions.

A Stolen property recovered from a 'thief' is the property of the person or business, etc who had lawful custody of it before it was stolen.

The police will use such property as exhibits to produce as evidence in bringing a prosecution against the 'thief', but they do not assume ownership of it. If ownership is disputed/challenged then the Courts will make direction as to the disposal of the stolen property on completion of any prosecution.

#### Q How long is the property held for?

A Stolen property, in the form of exhibits, will be held until any prosecution in relation it to is has been completed.

In certain circumstances the stolen property may be photographed and the photographs used so that the property can be returned to its lawful owner.

#### Q Who is responsible for replacement if any consumable stolen property becomes outdated whilst being held by the police?

A One of the circumstances in which the use of photographs may be used instead of the stolen property itself is if it is perishable or likely to become outdated.

The items would be returned to the lawful owner before this occurred. If the stolen property was recovered, perished or outdated, then an application for compensation from the 'thief' would be made in court by the Prosecuting Authority. The court would then make an award or otherwise as it saw fit.

Q I HAVE read and re-read "your questions answered" Penguin News August 17, reference Cable and Wireless download speeds. So what are they?

#### ${f A}$ Justin McPhee of Cable and Wireless answered this question.

We did not specify an actual download speed in our answer to the original question because there are too many variables to guarantee any given speed. As I tried to explain in our original answer, actual internet download speeds can vary depending on time of day, amount of users accessing the internet and capability of the remote server.

Cable and Wireless continually

reviews the international internet capacity and has regularly upgraded this capacity and to meet demand.

**O** CAN the directors of the Wool Company explain how they are justifying the bonus payment of £40,000 on top of the £60,000 salary being paid to the Managing Director out of public funds?

A Mr Mark Brunet, Chairman of the Wool Company answered this auestion.

£40k is fanciful; the £30k in October (on the projections submitted to ExCo) includes salary and pension for the Managing Director and Manager.

There is a small performance related element in the Managing Director's potential remuneration (much less than £40k) which is only paid against success in raised selling price significantly over and above the benchmark, and is less than income to farmers which accrues as a result.

O IF a person who has immigrated to the Falklands then goes on to receive their Status, does their spouse automatically receive Status too?

A Principal Immigration Officer Peter King replied, "Yes, and this is provided for by Section 17(5)(e) of the Constitution.

"The acquisition of status as a spouse under s17(5)(e) is, however, subject to that spouse not living apart from her husband or his wife, as the case may be, under a decree of a competent court or a deed of separation. S17(5)(f) of the Consutition also provides that any children under the age of 18 years will also acquire status ("children" can include a child, stepchild, or child adopted in a manner recognised by law) under this scenario.

Oliver Moorey (13) and Laura Miller (12) both of Year 8 were selected as winners of the competition, with designs depicting thistles and an earwig respectively.


Addressing the students at FICS. Invasive Species Officer Brian Summers said that he was glad he had not been tasked to judge the entries which were of a very high standard.

## **Planning and Building news**

by Graham France FOLLOWING the usual preliminaries at the meeting of the Planning and Building Committee held last week, members were given an updated briefing by Andrea Wright, the Environmental Planning Officer (EPO), on four appeals going through Executive Council.

Two concerned proposed development at 31 Ross Road West and the others were do with Malvina House Hotel and land west of the Beaver Hangar on Moody Brook Road.

The first three of twelve applications for planning permission were for the renewal of temporary consent, two of which were granted for further limited periods (the siting of a Wyseplan unit for KTV Limited on their site at Dairy Paddock Road, and for a Portakabin at 3 Brandon Road West for Peter McKay) with the third deferred for discussions on the possibility of roofing the mobile storage unit at 13 Ian Campbell Drive for Ken and Jacki Morrison.

Deferred at the last meeting was Donna Triggs' outline application for a dwelling to be located on the south side of Airport Road just west of the Murray Heights caravan park. Members reviewed a report by the EPO and decided to grant outline planning permission subject to conditions which included the requirement that no development is to commence until such time as detailed infrastructure proposals have been submitted, approved and physically provided.

#### New applications

Planning permission was granted conditionally for the following proposals: an extension to their existing porch at 12 Endurance Avenue for Wayne McCormick and Alison Baker: the replacement of a shed with a Portakabin for use as a store/workshop for Graham Middleton at 50 Davis Street; extensions and alteration to the Sand Bay Abattoir also the replacement of their existing offices and temporary offices with a single storey administration area for FIDC; and the erection of an "American Steel Span" building for use as a store/workshop for Peter McKay at his premises located at Plot 32 Lookout Industrial Estate.

There was one new outline application considered which was for a dwelling on land at the rear of 54 Davis Street submitted by Melanie Clausen. Conditional outline consent was granted with a 7.5 metre height limit to be observed when detailed plans are prepared for the project.

One application was deferred: Gavin Thomas and Sharon Henry sought planning permission to erect a one-and-a-half storey dwelling on land east of 25 Ross Road East. There were concerns that this would result in over-development of the site and there are to be discussions held so that this might be resolved.

The proposal submitted by Richard Gittens for the erection of one two-storey dwelling and two single-storey dwellings on land at 14 - 16 Goss Road was rejected since it was considered that it would result in over-development of the site and lead to an unacceptable level of residential amenity for the future occupiers of the houses.

Before closing Part I of the meeting, the committee noted progress on applications for Building Permits and heard from the EPO an update on the public consultation on issues and options of the Stanley Town Plan Review.

The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, October 4, to commence at 8.30am and be held as usual in the Liberation Room at the Secretariat.

## **Rockhopper Exploration receive 3-D data**

ROCKHOPPER Exploration Plc have received the final processed volume of 3-D data collected by CGG between November 2006 and January 2007.

The survey covered an area of over 328 square miles (850 sq km) off the Falkland Islands. The additional time taken to process the data was used to further improve the data quality.

Interpretation of the data will

commence now and is likely to be completed within three months.

The data was collected over licenses PL032 and PL033, where Rockhopper holds a 100 percent interest in both licenses.

Two wells were drilled by Shell on the acreage during 1998. Live oil was recovered from one, while oil and gas shows were found in the other.

By Jenny Cockwell THE prospect of having to go to hospital in a foreign country. especially one in which you don't speak the language, can be daunting.

However, as I discovered earlier this year, the staff at Clinica Alemana in Santiago are there to do as much as they can to make your hospital visit as stress-free as possible.

In July my husband - who is lucky enough to speak Spanish - was a patient for a month in the Chilean hospital; I don't speak Spanish and, therefore, was concerned I might not be able to keep up with everything that was going on

I needn't have worried. Almost all the doctors we met spoke excellent English and, though many of the nurses only spoke Spanish, if I missed anything I only had to ask and it would be explained to me in English. Also there to help were Lizzie Olivares and Carmen Luz, two English-speaking staff members who are dedicated to looking after Falklands patients and their families.

Lizzie and Carmen work closely with Stanley's King Edward VII Memorial Hospital and schedule and coordinate all appointments for Falklands patients, including doctor visits and procedures required by the hospital; they also schedule tests, book rooms in cases where patients need hospitalisation, coordinate ambulance services (both by air and road) and, when necessary, organise transport from the hospital to the patient's hotel.

Not only this, but they also provide any other assistance that may be required either by the patient or by his/her physician and the hospital they organise financial arrangements, including advance estimates for fees or payments and they send through medical reports to the hospital.

Lizzie and Carmen are well aware of peoples' concerns over the language barrier and, if required, they accompany outpatients to appointments or tests to help translate. However, they always try to choose an English speaking doctor to avoid any problems

As for hospitalised patients, Lizzie

Glenda's family were allowed to visit at any time, "...and the staff are quite happy and indeed encourage partners to stay on the ward at night where they supply a sofa bed," she says. "This I particularly appreciated as I don't think I have ever stayed by myself for a night anywhere, even in the Falklands.

Keith Knight spent a number of weeks as an outpatient at the clinic. He too found no problem with the language barrier, "...as most of the doctors that I had dealings with could all speak pretty good English."

He adds. All the medical equipment is state of the art. I accompanied my husband on a physiotherapy session and was seriously impressed not only by the equipment on offer but also by the number of staff working one to one with patients.

The hospital is located at the junction of two main roads. Avenida Manquehue Norte and Avenida Vitacura, and is in easy walking distance of a large number of hotels and the Parque Arauco mall, near the Marriott Hotel. A taxi from the mall to the hospital will cost you no more than  $\pounds 1.50$ .

Prospective patients at Clinica Alemana can rest assured they are ingood hands. Andy sums this up: "I found their manner was so reassuring, polite, professional and above all they really made you feel important to them and that they genuinely cared about your well being.

I have never experienced such an efficient and well run hospital be-fore; in my own experiences they kept to their appointment times almost to the second and even if they were running a little late, which I found to be rare, they were so apologetic."

## Mystery photo depicts 1968 'demonstation of Britishness'

PENGUIN NEWS was inundated with calls and emails from readers following the publication last week of a photo under the heading 'Anti Argentine protest or patriotic parade?'.

Among the respondents was Sarah Swanick, a reader in the UK who remembers the photograph being taken.

She wrote: "I'm standing almost in the centre, two or three people back next to a very tall man in a whaler's cap – he was at that time Lieutenant Commander Chris Stafford (second in command of Naval Party 8902/Hovercraft unit stationed up at the Head of the Bay) and I was working up at Government House as the Private Secretary to the then Governor, Sir Cosmo Haskard. "The photo was insti-

who had taken up the Falkland Islanders' battle against the Argentine claim to sovereignty and wanted a photo to illustrate the strength of feeling in the Islands behind their desire to remain British and resist the Argentine claim. Politically, things were brewing at that time and it would not be long before the then Labour Government (Harold Wilson was PM) sent out Lord Chalfont and his party in November 1968 to assess the situation on the ground so to speak and, with unspoken (in public at that time) intent to persuade the Falkland Islands Government to take a more 'reasonable view' of the situation.

"Anyone who remembers that period and, particularly, the stalwart and unflinching position taken by Sir Cosmo and Executive Council in defence of the Islanders' right to determine their own future, will also no doubt recall the delight with which we all turned out to be photographed.

"Chris left the Falklands on October 3, 1968 and, from memory, this photo was taken some time towards the end of September 1968. I have a print of that same photo (as I think did everyone who appeared in it). We were all asked to appear in front of the whalebone arch and, naturally, everyone who could possibly get there arrived in good time, be they Islanders, ex-pats or, in those days, the rare visitors (compared to now)."



Former head of broadcasting, Patrick Watts says his station broadcast calls for as many members of the community as possible to gather and "show their Britishness."

In the photograph he recognises, "...Neville Bennett (dental technician) Frank Buse (Veronica Summers' father) and Fred Jones, father of Bernardo of *Mercopress* fame. Fred was a qualified sea captain but was probably working with the Alginates Kelp Company at the time that the photo was taken.

"I recall that Campers came in to offer their support and be included in the photo."

Sally Blake arrived on the Darwin with the Daily Express photographer. She also remembers the time well - "we were in crisis". She believes this was the first protest demonstration ever held in the Falklands and recalls, "We were cross but scared too."

Betty Turner, who was 19 years old at the time, believes it was the first time that the phrase, "Sell us down the river for a pound of bully beef" was coined.

Our thanks also to Lard McLeod, Tim Miller, Richard Cockwell, Chris Harris, Kay McCallum, John Halford, Ailsa Heathman, Neil Watson and the many other people who called about the picture.

#### Islanders' letter of protest to British Government

IN FEBRUARY 1968, unofficial members of the Falkland Islands Executive Council, AG Barton, RV Goss, S Miller and GCR Bonner wrote to British Members of Parliament to protest at the negotiations proceeding between the British and Argentine governments which they feared would result in the handing-over of the Islands to Argentina. The letter asked the MPs to note: "The inhabitants of the Islands

The letter asked the MPs to note: "The inhabitants of the Islands have never yet been consulted regarding their future - they do NOT want to become Argentines - they are as British as you are...

"The people of these Islands do not wish to submit to a foreign language, law, customs and culture because for 135 years they have happily pursued their own peaceful way of life, a very British way of life..." Penguin News, September 14 2007



Paul Clarke (32) took an impromptu sea voyage when he was 16 and feared he would never see dry land again. Sixteen years later he has travelled the world and is now preparing to take his Masters oral exam. This will give him a Master Foreign Going qualification for any sized vessel.

I HAD my first taste of seagoing life in 1991 when I was 16 and working for Stanley Growers. Tim Miller kindly agreed to me having a month off, with about an hour's notice so I could join the *Throsk* as a messman for a voyage back to the UK. They were the longest few weeks of my life... I thought I would never see land again!

Anyway. I can't have disliked it too much as four years later when working for PWD design office, I applied to join the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) as a deck boy and joined the *Bransfield* on its mid-season call to Stanley.

That was the beginning of a fairly social few years as some people may well remember! When we were in Stanley on the ship I came to an arrangement with my mother (Valerie Morrison) that she would collect me after work, take me home and feed me then deliver me to the pub. She learned quickly that the words, "I will make my own way up, don't worry," are also sailor speak for. "I am just nipping into the Vic on the way. I may be some time."

I worked on the Bransfield and the James Clark Ross over the next few years, living by now in Southampton, and working for ship crewing agencies during my leave from BAS to get extra seatime and experience towards attending college. I did trips on ferries, dredgers and other coastal ships, including some work for Byron Marine to collect the Dorada from New Zealand and to Punta Arenas to slip the Forrest. I went to college at Warsash (Southampton) in 2000 to Officers get тy Deck watchkeeping ticket.

After doing a number of refits up in Newcastle Upon Tyne. I decided to move North and resettled here in 2003.

Not long after, 1 met my wife Christy who is originally from California but moved to Scotland as a teenager and was into the last few years of her training at Newcastle University to be a Clinical Psychologist.

I spent a year ashore doing my Chief Mate's certificate at South Tyneside College, so between her finishing her Doctorate and me getting my head around stability it was a fairly intense year! She finished her training to become Dr Christy and now works for the National Health Service (NHS). I passed my ticket and went back to sea on the *Ernest Shackleton* before a final trip on the JCR ending in May 2006.

We had planned a round-theworld trip for as soon as I got off the ship to celebrate passing all our exams; what we hadn't told anyone was we intended to get married on the trip. We took our vows on a beach in Fiji in June 2006 before having parties with our fami-



lies in California and Newcastle. The one in Stanley will be in January, better late then never l guess!

After 11 years I decided it was time to move on from BAS. I wanted to start working offshore in the oil fields, so I moved to Swire Pacific Offshore, firstly to Sakhalin (Russia) then Malaysia on an anchor handler, after that to the North Sea and then out to India on a platform supply boat. Here, re-affirming my wife's belief that everyone from the Falklands will meet someone with a connection wherever you are, the Captain said that I must already know the person I was relieving. It turned out to be Chris Hurst (son of artist Una and Dave Hurst) who is from the Falklands.

Now I work for a Norwegian company, Farstad Shipping, first on a multi role anchor handler in the Philippines, doing ROV work and inspection diving as well as supply work to the platform and at the moment 1 am in Singapore doing big drydockings on two ships.

The offshore ships are great to be on as the Mate. Generally you and the Captain are on back-toback watches while you are driving alongside the rig or anchor handling, - it's very hands on ship handling and all of the newer ships have DP (dynamic positioning) which we also use quite a lot. These ships are mostly small enough not to require a pilot so if I am on watch and we arrive/depart a port or need to shift berths (very frequent in most offshore bases!) then generally I get left to do it, something that doesn't happen on many ships until you are the Captain.

Working with multinational crews is something I also enjoy. For example on one last year the Captain was from NZ, then me, the 2/O was Malaysian, Chief Engineer was Danish, 2/E was South African, 3/E was Scottish, cook and AB's either Philippino

or Indonesian! On another it was all Indian crew, curry three times a day... great!

On the last trip in the Philippines the crew, after a few San Miguels, managed to persuade me to eat Balut... basically half formed duck eggs, you eat the yolk/embryo, avoiding the beak and feet, it was interesting! The time away is an occupational hazard of the job but with better communication it isn't so bad. When I started we were allowed one faxed letter a month compare this with now when internet and direct dial into your cabin is available. All the ships I have been working on have good email and phone access as a minimum, more and more are having internet access fitted, Farstad are fitting it to all ships in the fleet so let's hope they hurry up and do mine!

I would certainly recommend the seagoing lifestyle to anyone wishing to get out and see some of the world, but be prepared for time away from home, long hours and the odd expensive phone bill. This for me is offset by the leave and the chance to travel all over the world. Anyone who finishes school with decent GCSEs or with A levels, can apply for a cadetship and go on to become a Deck Officer or Engineer, although unfortunately there is much less opportunity to join ships as deckhands or motormen these days

The future for me? To take my Masters oral exam in a few months time, this will mean I have a Master Foreign Going qualification for any vessel of any size. It will be nice to finally complete my training.

Even further ahead I will eventually want to work ashore but while I can keep working away I will - after all any commute further than up a flight of stairs is far too much!

## Wool market report for week ending September 7, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices generally slipped at sales in Australia last week. The only exceptions were 25 and 26 micron fleece lots which gained 5 p/kg clean and "remained steady" respectively.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, price falls were between 2 and 7 pence per kilogram clean.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down approximately 4 p/kg clean at 367.5 p/kg clean compared to the previous weeks closing level of 371.4 pence per kilogram clean.

Buying interest was quite widespread with a solid mix of top makers active. Analysts however, report a belief that China will remain relatively subdued in the market over the coming months to ensure that quota restrictions are not exceeded.

In South Africa, according to the Wool Record Weekly, prices were "on a par with, or slightly dearer, than Australian prices"

In Australia last week 89% of the 50,499 bales offered to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 5,001 bales of crossbred wool of which 84 % were sold. In New Zealand 88% of the 12,575 bales available were sold while in South Africa 97% of the 9,737 bales on offer were purchased.

Next week approximately 80,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in South Africa, Australia and New Zealand.



# No full-timers for this council

DESPITE many people thinking it was a done deal, councillors have decided not to adopt a full time salary option during the life-span of this council.

Reporting the decision, Cllr Summers said it was taken for "a number of reasons"

The idea will be examined fur-ther and developed, "...with a view that something will be in place to propose to the next council so it will cross an election," he said.

As for their current pay structure, councillors will continue with the current system of allowance at the same rates but with one proposed change which they will take to Legislative Council in Noveniber: that the number of portfolio days for which councillors can claim pay will be increased from three per month to five.

### The full-time debate

Many people had assumed the move to allowing councillors take the option of being full time workers would be agreed and introduced in November. However, in what appears to be an about-turn, Cllr Summers says there was a, "tirm consensus decision," to delay.

There were a number of issues surrounding the making of the decision, he said, "...some to do with whether it is appropriate to introduce such a scheme during the life of a council. We all knew the rules when we started, why change them half way through?"

He added that, in the current council, it is unlikely that a majority of people would take up the option of a full time salary, "...and it might therefore prejudice the minority.

In the meantime the implementation of the new portfolio struc-ture will continue. This new structure, councillors believe, creates a division between those with Executive Council responsibility and those with portfolio responsibility.

"The portfolio holders are the non-ExCo members, so there is a division of responsibility which provides a degree of scrutiny and supervision," Cllr Summers commented.

"The ExCo members never sit as members on any of the five portfolios but they do have a responsibility to attend meetings to listen and understand what's going on. They will have no voting power on the committees.'

FLAGS will fly at half mast in the Falkland Islands on October 5, the day of the funeral of Major General Sir Jeremy Moore, the Commander of British Land Forces during the Falklands War.

Already well known within the Royal Marines and the British Army as a gallant officer, the Falklands War made Sir Jeremy a household name in Britain, most of the English-speaking world, and in Argentina.

The culmination of his military career was the surrender of the Argentine forces in June 1982. He famously refused to allow the Argentine General Mario Menendez to use the name 'Islas Malvinas' in the surrender document, dismissing it as a propaganda term. For his service in the Falklands he was appointed KCB.

Sir Jeremy (79) died suddenly but peacefully on Saturday, September 15. Representing the Falkland Islands at his funeral in Wells Cathedral will be Councillor Ian Hansen and the Islands' UK Representative, Sukey Cameron. A Book of Condolence has been placed in Gilbert House for those members of the public who wish to pay tribute to Sir Jeremy

At 10.30 am on Sunday, October 7, there will be a special service of welcome at the Cathedral, at which Richard will be officially presented by the Governor and installed as Rector of the Falkland Islands.

Members of the other churches in Stanley and Mount Pleasant will join in the service, which will be followed by a lunch in the Parish Hall.

Richard will officially take up his duties as Rector on Monday, October 8.

'Governor Gurr'

A FORMER Chief Executive of the Falkland Islands Government has been named as the new Governor of St Helena.

Andrew Gurr was Chief Executive from 1994 - 1999 and published a book, A Little Piece of England, about his experiences in the Falklands.

# **Penguin News**

### Comment by Managing Editor, Jenny Cockwell

IT WAS with great sadness that we learned of the death of Major General Sir Jeremy Moore. While I never had the opportunity to meet him face to face. I have heard many tales about this distinguished gentleman and earlier this year I exchanged emails with him about his message for the Liberation Edition of *Penguin News*.

I tried to coax a recent photograph out of him but he confessed to hating looking at pictures of himself and said everyone would have to remember what he looked like 25 years ago which, he joked, was, "...probably older than I do now!"

Sir Jeremy became one of the icons of the Falklands War; from as early as I can remember I knew who he was - the tall, slightly grubby, man in green who delivered the good news to the people who had been sheltering in the West Store.

So many people have personal anecdotes about him, it seems like everyone who was here in 1982 met him at some point and he created a lasting impression.

I like this account from Gerald Cheek: "I was driving up to the temporary military headquarters site at the old school hostel a few days after the surrender when I came face to face with one of the ex-Argentine Mercedes G-Wagons. When I pulled over, my Land Rover's wheel slipped off the road and I was stuck.

"When I got out of the vehicle the Mercedes had stopped and the driver had also got out and said. "...have you got a tow-line, if so I will give you a tow." I realised it was the Major General as he had called in to see us all at Fox Bay (where Gerald was interred) the day after the surrender. He towed me out and I thanked him very much. It certainly occurred to me that not everyone would have stopped to offer their help, perhaps least of all the Commander of the British land forces."

It was a simple gesture but it sums up the way so many people viewed him, as the best type of British officer. Sir Jeremy, along with all the veterans, will always hold a special place in the hearts of Islanders.

*****

IT IS a sad fact that, as time passes, we will lose more of these heroes of 1982. As Mike Bowles, the chairman of the pilgrimage committee said this week, Falklands veterans now range in age from their mid-40s to their 70s and 80s. With each major anniversary, more will be gone and so it is important - for both Islanders and veterans - that we make their visits back to the Falklands as memorable as possible.

Having hosted a veteran back in 2002 I can vouch for what a great experience it is. We met a stranger that first day but within hours we had added another member to our family; we are lucky enough to see 'our vet' every year and it's a bond that we all feel will last.

If you haven't yet offered up a bed for a vet during this year's pilgrimage, please do so. You are as likely as he is to benefit from the experience.

### 'Rebeccas' work to protect rare plants

ARE ENDEMIC island plants secure in the South Atlantic? To some extent, it seems that this depends on whether the plant likes wind or not.

On St Helena, the St Helena Olive went extinct in 1993 and only two specimens of the endemic Bastard Gum remain at Pounceys. However, after the gales experienced on St Helena during the last two weeks, Rebecca Cairns-Wicks of the St Helena National Trust reported that both specimens, "...have been hit hard by the wind and had lost some of their greenery and their roots have been loosened."

She questioned whether St Helenians and conservations globally haven't learnt enough from the Olive. "Conservation remains inadequately equipped and resources spread too thinly to conserve all the island's acutely rare flora and fauna," she explained.

However, in contrast the prospects for the 13 plant species endemic to the Falkland Islands are somewhat more secure with the start of Falkland Conservation's latest initiative, 'Falklands Plant Conservation Programme', which is funded by the Overseas Territory Environment Programme, and the government's Department of Agriculture and Environmental Studies Budget.

Falklands Conservation were able to recruit their own Rebecca to lead the two-year programme. British biologist Dr Rebecca Upson explained that, "plant life on the edge," is what she likes to study and that is why she chose to work in the Falklands, after survey work in Antarctica.

Rebecca's background is in eco-physiological and molecular research into the weird and wonderful world of plant-fungal interactions in Antarctic terrestrial ecosystems. This has been interspersed with various plant conservation projects and teaching roles. "That's why I'm looking forward to my time here, working on a project that addresses many different areas of plant conservation," Rebecca explained.

She arrived in Stanley about a week ago, fresh from completing a two month International Di-

ploma in Plant Conservation strategies at Kew Gardens. She says the course stressed the importance of five key conservation needs, which her job here also addresses: "Understanding and documenting plant diversity, conserving plant diversity, using plant diversity sustainably, promoting education and awareness about plant diversity and building capacity for the conservation of plant diversity."

In collaboration with Kew Gardens, Rebecca will be building on previous botanical surveys to identify the most important areas for plants (IPAs) across the Islands. This work is part of a global initiative very similar to the Important Bird Areas scheme. Another part of her job will be working with the Department of Agriculture and Elephant Beach Farm (EBF). She explains: "I'll be carrying out the botanical research side of a whole-farm rotational grazing trial that aims to investigate the benefit of more sustainable land-use practices."

Rebecca will also be assisting with the Invasive Species Project and running a plant identification course at the end of the summer for anyone who is interested. "If there are other plant-related topics that people are interested in knowing more about then let me know and I can organise an evening talk or activity.

"Anyone interested in volunteering to help with fieldwork either for the EBF project or the IPA scheme would be welcomed."

### Sale of SSL shares 'not forgotten' says councillor

ONE could be forgiven for thinking the sale by the government of shares in Stanley Services Ltd has long been discarded.

However Chairman of SSL, ClIr Mike Summers, is adamant this is not the case. He says it remains a policy decision of this council that the government's shares in SSL (45%) should be made available for sale to local businesses and the public.

No person or company will be allowed to hold more than 5%.

The long delay is due, he says, to the setting up of the legal framework for the sale which will be, "...a long and complicated piece of work," adding that it remains in a queue in the Attorney General's Chambers, with no clear date for action.

"It is largely to do with capacity in the Attorney General's Chambers to deal with it. There is a huge backlog of legislation and other work to be churned out."

However he says that now the workforce at the AGs Chambers is back up to full strength, "...we anticipate seeing in due course a programme of work."

Some may feel the work should have been outsourced however Cllr Summers says this was not done for a number of reasons: "It is bloody expensive and usually involves as many hours in policy and guidance as doing it yourself."

AN Argentine member of congress has presented a bill calling for the establishment of a bilingual broadcasting station targeted at the Falkland Islands.

Daniel Gallo, Deputy of the province of Tierra del Fuego and belonging to the ruling coalition of President Nestor Kirchner, said the station would be located in Rio Grande, the second largest city of Argentina's most extreme southern province.

He has proposed the establishment of a, "24 hour broadcasting service, both in English and Spanish geared to the Malvinas Islands (sic) from the studios of Radio Nacional in Rio Grande and with the purpose of spreading Argentine culture and news.

Programming, he said, should focus on different aspects of Argentine culture and include daily information related to Argentina and the region about, "...politics, economics, history, sports and traditional values which make to the Argentine identity.

As to the actual broadcasting, Snr Gallo insists all programs must permanently insist on Argentina's "sovereignty rights" over the Falkland Islands, South

Georgia, South Orkneys and South Sandwich Islands.

Councillor Janet Robertson does not believe many Islanders will be tempted to listen but she said the government will not try to block the signal from Argentina. She commented, "It is unlikely that FIG would seek to block a signal coming from overseas not least because it is unlikely that this could be done legally.

"Freedom of information laws would suggest that people are entitled to listen to whatever legal broadcasting they would choose to.

However, she added that a programme of this nature would need to compete with the Falklands' local broadcasting services and BFBS, and would be unlikely to attract much attention locally.

"I would also expect that our committment to self-determination and being British would not be challenged by a programme of this nature whilst at the same time offering people an opportunity to have a further insight into Argentine politics, economics and society if they so wished it."

### £3 million price tag for ferry terminals

The Second Creek terminal is designed to solely cater for the ferry vessel, Concordia Bay. Other ships - such as the St Brandan will continue using Port Howard jetty

Some may argue this is a short sighted approach given the amount being spent on the Second Creek option. Cllr Summers says not "The Port Howard jetty face will remain, so it can be used by appropriate vessels, and in any event the jetty at Fox Bay is where the SAAS vessel or its anticipated successors would call. This is not therefore a consideration in the decision making process and has never been part of the design brief."

The decision to go with Second Creek has given the government time to consider "what is really best at Second Creek without holding up the commencement of the ferry service." Councillor Summers says. "There are discussions surrounding the shape and size of breakwaters to be concluded, possibly seeking advice from wider afield than just the current proposed operator, as well as animal welfare issues and power and water.

'Given this schedule the current budget is sufficient to do Newhaven, the temporary facility at Port Howard and ancillaries, and we can plan in future budgets for the West option. "

When asked by Penguin News if the government would be facing a lower bill for the terminals had the coastal shipping contract been awarded to the other tenderer, West Marine, Cllr Summers disagreed. He commented, "The view of the Tender Board when selecting the Workboat Services Ltd option was that infrastructure cost for the two options would be similar, though clearly at that stage there could not have been detailed design for either.

"This though was not the only consideration.

### West Store declared a rodent-free zone

SHOPPERS in the West Store on Thursday last week had a nasty surprise when they spotted a rat in one of the aisles.

They alerted staff and the West Store Manager contacted Val Berntsen who came in to set traps.

Dave Castle, a Falkland Islands Company director reported that on Friday Mr Berntsen caught a rat and has continued to check daily, "...with no further rats caught or seen.

Mr Castle assured shoppers that Mr Berntsen visits FIC premises on a regular basis, "...to try and ensure we do not get this sort of problem, and has proved very effective."

He could not say how the rat got into the store but speculated that it was most likely "while a door was open", something he said is difficult to prevent, "...with so many deliveries coming in.'

# Argentine radio to hit local airwaves | Beds for veterans still needed

BEDS are still needed for a number of the veterans due to visit the Islands on a pilgrimage in November.

Most of the veterans have been allocated beds in Islanders' homes but eighty still need to be accommodated.

Chairman of the pilgrimage, Mike Bowles, is in the Islands this week to help resolve the few remaining organisational issues in preparation for the pilgrimage. While he says this pilgrimage will have a "lower profile" than that held in 2002, it will be bigger, with around 250 veterans and bereaved family members visiting the Islands.

Funding has been easier this time round, thanks to a massive grant from the Big Lottery Fund and donations from both the Islands and the UK. This means the pilgrimage can be opened up to more people and has not been limited to just SAMA members or those specifically referred by Combat Stress, the charity which helps treat people with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder

The shortage of beds is the only major hold up in the planning. The military had offered the use of Hillside Camp but the pilgrimage committee has decided that a barracks-like environment may not be beneficial to many of the visiting veterans and they would much prefer them to be hosted by families, where possible.

The benefits to veterans of staying in Islanders' homes cannot be underestimated the Chairman of SAMA in the Falklands, Gary Clement says. "Contact with Islanders is one of the best things about the pilgrimage." He adds, "Even if people can't offer more than accommodation on a B&B basis, that is absolutely fine.

However, if needs be, Hillside Camp will be used and Gary says if anyone has old sheets and guilts to donate, these would be grate-fully accepted. "We don't want them to have to kip in sleeping bags for a week and the military can't offer bedding."

Honourary Chairman of SAMA82, Sir Malcolm Hunt will be holidaying in the Falklands at the same time as the pilgrimage takes place and he will give an address at the veterans' opening reception on November 6. This will be a public reception, sponsored by VT Communications, to which everyone is invited.

Also being arranged is a BYO family dance, sponsored by the Royal British Legion, which will be open to the public, along with another public reception on November 12, the veterans' last night in the Islands.

Also joining the pilgrims will he Derck Twigg MP, the Veterans' Minister. Mike Bowles is pleased Mr Twigg will be along for the ride as, "...he is the first minister for veterans, he's still feeling his way and he is very keen to get to know about veterans matters. There is no better way than this.

### SSVC engineers work at restoring TV quality

SSVC engineers are investigating a problem which has caused interference on the television picture received by West Falklands vjewers.

Stuart Holmes reported that the engineers have visited Mt Maria three times in the last week to attempt to rectify the TV transmission fault, but have so far been unable to restore the service to nominal levels.

He explained the problem: "As many of our viewers will remember, we had a small electrical fire at the generator site at Port Howard a few weeks ago which left Mount Maria without heating or ventilation for a while.

"It would appear now that snow and ice ingress into the transmitter, via the ventilation system, is the probable cause for the problems we are currently experiencing.

Mr Holmes and his colleagues are in contact with the manufacturer of the transmitter and are attempting to get together the necessary spares and specialist equipment to repair the system.

He commented, "Unfortunately, I have no accurate timescale for this at the moment. Rest assured we will keep you up to date with any developments through BFBS and FIRS.

"We will continue to attempt a local repair to try and minimise the impact of this disruption."

### Police to rebuild confidence and integrity

CHIEF Police Officer Paul Elliot has paid tribute to Inspector Len McGill's work during his almost two years as Acting Chief of Police.

"Len did a fantastic job," said Superintendent Elliot, a sentiment which was echoed by the Police Committee at their meeting on Tuesday.

Superintendent Elliot told the Committee that while compiling his review of the Royal Falklands Police Force he would find out from the community how they perceive the force. He said that, as an early observation, one of the initial issues that need to be tackled within the community is the rebuilding of confidence and integrity in the force.

He added that there are issues of bullying and harassment within the force that need to be, "...put to bed before we can move on."

Superintendent Elliot said he was thrilled at the investment in the Police Station building for an extension, as the present one has, "served its purpose." Councillor Rendell welcomed Mr

Councillor Rendell welcomed Mr Elliot to the Islands saying that it was very encouraging to hear his background and plans, adding, "Everyone needs to pull together to bring the force back to where it was."

### Staffing levels

Justice of the Peace Committee member Andy Brownlee asked the Chief of Police whether there are enough staff to cover the task asked of him.

Superintendent Elliot said there would need to be adjustments to shifts to provide better cover, adding that having to provide cover for the prison contributed to making things tight.

He highlighted the less than satisfactory system that means there is little police cover after 2am saying that most crimes seemed to be committed after that time.

### Road signage

Mr Brownlee also flagged up the lack of signage on Camp roads, saying that it could be a contributory factor to fatalities. He said he had raised the subject in March, however no substantial action has been taken to improve the situation and, although it is not directly a matter for the Police Committee, he wanted to ensure it doesn't "slip off the radar." Inspector McGill said he had in the past dealt with PWD and received no action.

Attorney General David Pickup said as a newcomer to the Islands it is not just Camp signage that is lacking and that there is also a need for more signage at some zebra crossings, a suggestion that was backed by Superintendent Elliot.

Councillor Summers said it is not a resource issue, that the signs can be produced, adding that it is a practical issue between the police department and the Highways Section of PWD,

Superintendent Elliot is to meet with Director of Public Works to discuss the issue.

### DARE programme

Sergeant Dave Roberts has been approached by the Youth Stategy Group and has expressed an interest in taking up the DARE programme again, however this is work load dependent, explained Inspector McGill.

Sgt Roberts ran the popular programme in the Infant and Junior School for several years but was forced to give it up due to a heavy workload. Councillors are now keen to expand the programme to include the Community School and Councillor Summers has suggested on several occasions that somone should be brought to the Islands to train people so that it is not dependent on the police force.

Inspector McGill explained that the programme has a history of being delivered by police officers, sometimes retired officers are used, because it provides a credible link to the matters being dealt with such as drugs, alcohol, tobacco, bullying etc.

A great deal of the information imparted is law based and tailored to the community in which it is delivered and the way in which such matters are policed in that community.

" It also provides direct and real contact between the young people involved in the scheme and their police service, something, as I have stated many times, that must be maintained," said Inspector McGill. He added, "We will explore

He added, "We will explore bringing in trainers to train people in the Falklands to enable them to deliver the scheme."

### Camp telephone system still under discussion

There has still been no agreement signed to secure the future of Canp telecommunications.

Doctor Chis Doyle, communications consultant for FIG has recently visited the Islands to offer further advice on the development of the Camp telephone system.

Cllr Mike Summers said there have been ongoing discussions for some time on how to develop the Camp network and provide the rural community with decent telephone and communication facilities and those discussions are continuing.

He said there are "adequate assurances" from Cable and Wireless that they can keep the present system Camp running until such time as there is something else in place. A fibre optic cable in place to Mount Pleasant has allowed a lot of the older system to be removed and that equipment is being used as spares and backup for the Camp system, the manufacturers of which no longer support.

"It is our aspiration that the telecom system in Camp should be as good as that in Stanley; what we are waiting for is to see a technical proposal that will deliver that at a reasonable price," said Cllr Summers.

The Cable and Wireless license to operate in the Islands has five years to run with the notice period for the termination of that license being five years. "We are at a point during the

"We are at a point during the course of this calendar year where we must decide how to proceed," he said.

### Kathleen is the new face at the KEMH

NEW Director of Health Kathleen Bree has taken up her position at the King Edward VII Hospital.

Ms Bree began her career as a Staff Nurse and has had a successful career in the health services sector, mainly based in Scotland. Prior to taking up her Falkands post she was Service Manager for Regional Public Health in the greater Wellington region of New Zealand.

Before that she was the Director of Allied Health Professionals and Nursing in the Orkney Islands.

### Third youth seatbelt case

A 14 YEAR-old boy was given an absolute discharge in the Youth Court on Tuesday, after he admitted riding in a vehicle without a seat belt.

The vehicle the boy was riding in left the road to the north of the triangle junction, Crown Counsel Julia Kraehling-Smith told the court, causing extensive damage to the vehicle with the driver being thrown from it.

Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson told the boy he was exceptionally lucky and that his actions could have resulted in serious injury or even death, adding however that the driver of the vehicle should have shown some responsibility to passengers and ensured their seat belts were on.

Miss Thompson granted an absolute discharge with a conviction recorded and ordered £70 costs to be paid.

# News from Executive Council's September meeting

# ITQ disposal: to tax or not to tax? Ferry rates provisionally set

A POLICY to amend the Taxes Ordinance to defer or eliminate the charge to tax on the disposal of Individual Transferrable Quotas (ITQ) in certain circumstances has been approved by Executive Council (ExCo).

Following the passing of the new fisheries legislation in 2005, which provides property rights access into the Falkland Island fishery. ITQ was granted to a number of Falkland Island fishing companies in early 2007.

ITQ was granted at no cost, Cllr Clausen explained, although it is an asset that could enhance the value of a company, "...as that company now has a right to catch entitlement and purchase of licences."

Legislation was enacted so that the sale of ITQ from one company to another is regarded as a revenue receipt and cost. However, CIIr Clausen reported, it was recognised that the value of the ITQ could also be converted to cash by disposal of shares in the company holding it. "Because the Falklands does not have Capital Gains tax this profit would not have been taxable. Therefore, legislation was introduced to bring the disposal of shares, as far as their value relating to ITQ, into the capital gains rules.

"The profit or loss arising from the disposal of the shares is added to the individual's other income for that year."

However, she added, it has now become clear that in certain circumstances a profit would be taxed where: a) no cash has been received for the ITQ (gift): b) in a retirement situation from a family company; and in some circumstances c) the cost to establish the profit would outweigh the tax on that profit. In order to accommodate these circumstances Executive Council approved a policy to amend the Taxes Ordinance to defer or eliminate the charge to tax on the disposal of ITQ in certain circumstances. A number of amendments are proposed which will now be discussed with members of the fishing industry following which amendments to the Taxes Ordinance will be drafted.

### **Resource rents**

Following a request for a paper on the issue of resource rents within the Falklands Fishery, the Director of Fisheries presented a number of possible ways forward to Executive Council.

A resource rent is a charge levied to allow access to a resource, in this case fish and squid. Cllr Clausen explained that the term 'resource rents' is used in preference to 'licence fee', "...as it is all encompassing and covers the rent charged for use of 25 years access to resource."

Cllr Clausen reported that Executive Council, whilst appreciative of the fact that the new system of property rights is very much in its infancy, has requested that work on the methodology for calculating the economic efficiency of ITQ holders should begin and that a further paper should come to the January meeting of Executive Council." A DRAFT schedule and freight rates for the new ferry, *Concordia Bay* have been accepted by ExCo.

Concordia Bay will take over from MV Tamar providing an East-West ferry and a coastal shipping service in February 2008.

In a paper prepared by Tim Cotter of FIDC, ExCo were given a number of rate options to choose from: they selected the first option which provided for the same level of income (92% subsidy) as is the case with the current coastal shipping service.

However this is not set in stone. Cllr Clausen explained: "Council recognised that the setting of freight rates will be an iterative process and that there was a need to consult with the private sector and the end consumer prior to the final rates being set.

"However, there is a need to start somewhere and so Council accepted the rates proposed which will raise a similar level of revenue as under the current system. "

The draft schedule, which was also accepted, runs on a six weekly cycle. Speaking to Falklands Radio, ClIr Clausen explained: "It is proposed that there would be three ferry crossings every other week; the weeks in between there would be two. There would also be one island circuit every other week (there are three circuits of islands that need to be serviced) and also, once every six weeks.

"There will be a trip to Stanley for fuel and that will hopefully also encompass a fuel delivery service to Fox Bay where there is storage and on sale facilities in place.

"Again, we look to receiving feedback from users and the general public so that we can take forward the plan and hopefully get more concrete freight rates and schedules in place."

### New complaints procedure for government

THE draft government Complaints Procedure has been adopted with effect from September 13.

This single corporate procedure provides, "...a clear route for all complaints against the government," Cllr Clausen said. "Complaints that will be dealt with through this procedure include all those related to application of policy and service (ie not about actual policy)."

A copy of the procedure can be obtained from Gilbert House or the Secretariat.

### **New TAC members**

THE Transport Advisory Committee has two new members. ExCo approved the appointment of Bill Pole-Evans to repre-

sent West Falkland mainland and Gerald Cheek to represent Stanley, for two years.

### Smoking age to be increased gradually

THE legal age of smoking is to be raised in stages to avoid criminalising under 18s who already smoke.

The Children and Young Person's (Tobacco) Ordinance 2007 was enacted in August with Sections 8 and 9 (respectively relating to the powers of teachers and to the legal age of smoking) suspended for further consideration.

This month ExCo received a Code of Practice for the Education Department and a request for amendments to Sections 3 and 8 (3) of the Ordinance to allow the implementation of the Ordinance as it applies to schools.

ExCo went on to request that the Attorney General draft an appropriate amendment to Section 9 to enable a staged increase in legal age from 16 to 17 years in November 2008 and 17 to 18 years in 2009 in order that young people over the age of 16 who already smoke are not criminalised.

### Planning appeals reconsidered by ExCo

A NUMBER of planning appeals which had been received at previous meetings of Executive Council have been considered once again.

Council upheld the appeal for the change of use from living room to temporary retail outlet for bicycles at 31 Ross Road West subject to a number of planning conditions as recommended by the Environmental Planning Officer, including confirmation of its temporary nature. The appeal to erect a new cycle shop at 31 Ross Road West was dismissed.

ExCo also upheld an appeal to erect a dwelling house on land to the north of Moody Brook Road subject to a number of planning conditions as recommended by the Environmental Planning Officer. SeAled PR Ltd

**ROCKHOPPER** Petroleum is to relinquish some of its acreage in the North Falklands Basin.

Its licences, PL023 and PL024, were granted in November 2004 with a three year initial term for a work programme of 2D seismic. In addition to this work Rockhopper also collected four Controlled Source Electromagnetic Survey lines, two over Ernest and two over Dolphin (formerly lead K) with positive results observed.

Director of Minerals, Phyl Rendell, confirmed all production licensees are required to relinquish acreage after an initial exploration phase. "Rockhopper Exploration is coming to the end of its first phase for licences PL023 and PL024 and under the terms of their licence they need to relinquish 50% of their acreage before moving into

Phase Two where they have to drill a well. They have advised FIG that they wish to move to Phase Two and have advised which acreage they will give up.

Phase 2 of the licence is for three years commencing November 2007, during which time Rockhopper is committed to drilling a single well between both licences.

Sam Moody, Managing Director of Rockhopper, commented, Having more than satisfied the obligations of Phase 1 of our licences and given the very encouraging results of this first phase, we are in a position to accept the obligation of drilling one well in Phase 2.

Ernest is a high quality prospect with the chance of finding hydrocarbons set at 40%."

### Environmental studies funding approved

AT THE Environmental Planning meeting on Friday, 50% of the Environmental Study budget was approved for a range of projects. The timing of projects was taken into account, so that the most urgent applications received funding in this round and other less urgent will be considered in February.

Funds were approved for the purchase of a Prion receiver and radio tags for the New Island Conservation Trust, while several other ap-plications by the Trust were deferred for further information. Funds for the management of

Gypsy Cove were approved for wardens, signage and viewing platforms, while money for urgent work needed for the path was not supported with the suggestion being made that volunteers could make repairs to the path

The Endurance group at the Infant and Junior School will receive funding for a day trip to Kidney Island and a four day trip to Saunders Island, and the Shallow Marine Survey Group have also received funds to continue their work cataloguing underwater discoveries.

# Rockhopper to relinquish acreage AIS systems to be installed on all Falklands' fishing vessels

THE installation of Automatic Identification Systems (AIS) is likely to be made mandatory for ships operating in Falklands waters.

However representatives of the fishing industry say the gov-ernment should foot the bill for the units.

AIS is a shipboard broadcast transponder system operating in the VHF band which is capable of sending ship-related information such as identity, position, course, and speed. This information can be received by other AIS equipped ships, a shore station, fishery protection vessels/aircraft and military assets.

Executive Council has opted to have AIS made mandatory over time but referred the issue back to the Fisheries Committee for discussion of acquisition and installation of the AIS units, particularly for vessels which may arrive in the Islands without the requisite equipment.

Director of Fisheries John Barton told the committee that the requirement for AIS has been driven more by the military than the Fisheries Department but the system could be useful to the latter.

Fishing industry representa-tive Stuart Wallace said that if the

government required AIS to be installed, the government should accordingly pay for it.

He added that his associates in Asia were very unhappy by the idea and also felt the Falkland Islands Government should pay for the units and their installation. The units cost at least £1,000 each.

His colleague Cheryl Roberts told the committee that her company had had AIS installed on a vessel which fished in South Georgia waters and the testing of the unit took two days. Were this to happen in Stanley, she said, "you could end up with 30 or 40 ships in the harbour at a time ...

She and Mr Wallace both expressed concern about the impact the mandatory requirement for AIS would have on, "opportunistic" illex vessels.

However, their concerns did not sway the government representatives from the requirement for AIS and Mr Barton will now work on how the supply and installation of the units might work before the issue is referred back to Executive Council.

It is proposed that July 1, 2008 will be the date for the introduction of the AIS requirement.



# Airbridge issues clarified?

I REFER to the letter in your September 7 issue from John Fowler from Portugal. There are a few issues I would like to clarify.

1. I believe this may be the same John Fowler who lives in Stanley and is the reporter for *Mercopress* from whom he apparently takes his information. Had he been listening to what has been said to date about the development of the airbridge, or even bothered to give me a call, he would know that there is much more to the discussions than a few premium seats. That would then have avoided him descending into speculative and abusive drivel about who would occupy_them.

There are a number of important issues about the development of the airbridge that we seek to address. The first, which has been discussed at high level in both political and official circles, is that the airbridge is operated by the MoD on behalf of the UK Government in support of the Falkland Islands. This is not always readily appreciated at grass roots level in the MoD but is an important principle. We have firm and consistent support for this view.

We have then had to balance the desirable with the practical, given that a key role of the airbridge is to be a trooping flight for the Falklands. The MoD pay by far the largest portion of the cost, but not all, and the civilian community is not taking any sales risk on its allocation - we make no payment for any unsold allocation. The balance of that risk therefore has to be carefully considered.

The development of the service will not be a once off change, but hopefully is incremental over the years with the civil community taking more of the commercial risk/reward and the responsibility, whilst still providing the essential military capability. Of the practical steps that are open to us in the first instance the most important is to implement an up to date and efficient internet based booking system that will be visible to tourists and other travellers. Plans are in hand for this. This will also enable FIG (or its contractor) to manage the yield on the seats available to us and make an increased contribution back to MoD. The premium seats will be occupied by those who are prepared to pay for them.

The usage statistics for the airbridge consistently demonstrate that the civil community does not utilise its allocation of seats. That will not only be a function of demand, but also of lack of visibility and flexibility within the system, including cut off dates; the latent demand from tourism and other business usage is difficult to quantify. Nevertheless there are options for flexibility and that too is a key issue that is being addressed in the negotiations.


Further issues of quality, customer handling and service are also under discussion.

Not all these issues will be "resolved" in the first instance, and we were disadvantaged in our negotiations by the recent tender process being conducted at short notice and the contract being for only one year, but this is an ongoing negotiation and we anticipate having a greater input into the next call for tenders than this one. MoD have also offered FIG a seat at the table when reviewing the performance of the airbridge operators.

ance of the airbridge operators. The matter of how "VIP's" are to be seated is still under discussion with the MoD. What is clear is that they will not take preference over paying customers. **Clir Mike Summers Stanley**



Thriving tussac plantation grows under Conservation's care

TUSSAC planters were blessed with good weather over the weekend as. for the third consecutive year, they worked to restore an area of Elephant Beach, Ben Berntsen's North Camp farm.

Members of staff from Falklands Conservation and a team of willing volunteers left town on Saturday morning laden with bags of tussac tillers collected from a flourishing area between Gypsy Cove and Hadassa Bay, with permission from the Environmental Planning Office.

The planting took place in an area of camp near the entrance to Little Creek. The headland was fenced off around six years ago in order to begin habitat restoration on land that has suffered from over grazing in the past. The removal of stock and the last two years of tussac planting around the coastline has now transformed some of the vast areas of bare, black, eroded peat.

Ali Liddle of Falklands Conser-vation explained, "There are now a number of flourishing tussac plantations around the headland made up of large healthy plants which have produced masses of seed heads over the last two years. These seeds have allowed the tussac to begin to spread naturally and lots of new plants can be found growing around the edge of the plantation and in the shelter of the larger bogs. It is this natural regeneration that is so satisfying to see

to expand the established areas of tussac as well as planting in some new locations around the edge of Little Creek inlet. Ali reported, "All the volunteers got stuck into the job with enthusiasm and it wasn't long before large blackened areas were dotted with green tussac plants which will hopefully grow as well as those planted over the last few years

After lunch they carried on planting to expand the most successful part of the plantation on the north coast. "The tussac bogs in this particular location are now well over a metre high and just as wide with masses of huge seed heads. It really is fantastic to see how well the plants are doing," Ali commented.

After the final tiller was planted the group reflected on the continued expansion of the Rustling Grass plantation, named in memory of Russell Smith who helped start the plantation with his daughters, Ellis and Ffion, in 2005.

They then headed out along the coast to explore the sand beaches and pebble beach where some of the volunteers enjoyed seeing their first Falkland penguins and sea lions. Ali commented, "For those of you who haven't made it to this lovely part of the Islands there is now an ideal opportunity to do so with the opening of self-catering accommodation at Elephant Beach farm.

GROUP of prospective A firefighters had a taste of life at the hot end at the weekend.

As part of the Fire and Rescue Service's latest recruitment drive, the seven hopefuls each spent the day paired off with a regular firefighter.

After a safety briefing they spent two hours learning about the equipment on fire appliances and rescue vehicle which they would get to use later on. They then headed out to the 'fire ground' at Stanley airport where they had the opportunity to cut up two cars, the airport fire crew were also subjected to a surprise exercise in the form of a car fire as a demonstration for the hopefuls.

In the afternoon they headed to the breathing apparatus bunker where they had the opportunity to wear a Breathing Apparatus (BA); their first turn in the bunker was smoke free but the second was in 'cold' artificial smoke.

This was the first time the Fire Service, which consists predominantly of volunteer members, had hosted a 'join up' day for prospective recruits.

Chief Fire Officer Gardner Fiddes said it gave the candidates a chance to "...get first hand experience and also be able to interact with other fulltime and retained staff, particularly those who joined last year."

He added that the exercise gave him a chance to gauge the level of interest in joining the fire service.

Gene Berntsen was one of the seven who tried his hand at firefighting for the day. He said the day far exceeded his expectations and he has been inspired to join. He commented, "It was a really good day, really interesting.

He said he particularly enjoyed experiencing the BA chamber and commented, "I didn't expect to get involved in anything so thands on' on the day.

In addition to the seven hopefuls who took part, Mr Fiddes says there are five others who have ex-pressed an interest. "They will probably all submit application forms and be given the opportunity to join but not all will make the course, for various reasons.

There is no set time for recruiting into the fire service and any suitable candidates wil be considered over the year, he added.

So who makes a good volunteer firefighter? Mr Fiddes explained. "Ideally, people who are not afraid of hard strenuous work while at the same time be able to enjoy themselves and able to commit to the training.

Anyone who is interested in joining can contact any of the fire station staff.

The crew are now planning their annual fire engine pull, which is due to take planning burget and part to take place on November 24, and they also plan to hold an open morning later on in the summer followed by demonstrations in the afternoon.

# 'Hot' work appeals to recruits A pentathlon with a difference





MODERN-DAY pentatheletes compete in a sanitised environment against other highly trained athletes, using the latest and most expensive equipment.

This was not the case, however, for Major Ed Frost-Kell, an army officer from The Light Dragoons, currently serving at Mount Pleasant, who decided he would complete a Modern Pentathlon on East Falkland

The Modern Pentathlon was introduced at the 5th Olympiad in Stockholm in 1912. It comprised the contemporary sports of pistol shooting, fencing, swimming, horse-riding and running. It was the Olympic Committee's belief that it would be the event, above all oth-ers, that, "...tested a man's moral qualities as much as his physical re-sources and skills." All five events have traditionally been completed in one day.

Ed's attempt was certainly not your average Modern Pentathlon. There was no swimming pool, flat



ground or tarmae racetrack, no trained show-jumping horses, and no other competitors. However, thanks to the generosity and support of John and Michelle Jones at Race Point Farm, and Donna and Michael Minnell at Moss Side Farm, Ed was able to ride over the camp, and the challenge became a battle against the elements, and his body.

On Friday, September 14. at 8.30am, Ed dived into the San Carlos River at the start of his intrepid challenge. He then rode 11 miles on horseback to San Carlos, ran 16 miles across the Sussex Mountains against the famous 'Falklands head-wind,' cycled (in lieu of fencing) 23 miles to Mount Pleasant Camp, culminating with a 9mm pistol combat shoot and a 1.5 mile run to the Joint Officers' Mess a total of 50 miles which he completed in ten hours.

He raised £1,100 money for Diabetes UK, a charity close to his heart as his sister has been diabetic since she was ten years old.

# **Return to Stanley for Harrier?**

A SEA HARRIER aircraft that served in the Falklands could soon stand as a gate guardian at Stanley Airport.

Airport. With the help of David Morgan a former Harrier pilot who served in 1982, Andy Brownlee. Tony Smith and Gerald Cheek are setting up a trust (Harrier FS Trust) and hope to secure the decomissioned aircraft for £25,000.

The XZ459 FA2 Sea Harrier that David Morgan flew sorties in has been identified as "suitable", Andy said.

"This Sea Harrier played a significant role during 1982 flying 53 missions and was involved in the first Harrier attacks on Stanley Airport on May 1, piloted by Gordy Batt and it was the first Harrier to land on the temporary strip at Port San Carlos, named HMS Sheathbill.

"We are awaiting confirmation of other significant actions that this Harrier took part in and it is thought there are several, making it a very significant part of what happened in 1982. There are only six other remaining Harriers intact from those that took part in the 1982 conflict. The current owner who restores aircraft for resale is keen for this Harrier to come to the Falklands and said that, provided the £25,000 already offered for it can be matched, he would let it come here. "

Councillors have agreed it would be a welcome addition to the airport and they are now waiting to see how the project progresses.

Developed as a private venture



by Hawker in the UK during the 1950s and 60s the brilliance of the Harrier design was made clear during 1982 when both navy sea Harriers and RAF Harriers were heavily used against both air and ground Argentine forces.

A high air to air success rate was achieved by the relatively slow Harrier against super sonic adversaries like the French designed Mirage used by the Argentine air force.

Islanders were soon referring to the noise of the chunky little vertical take-off jets as, 'the sound of freedom' and it was with some sadness that they were bid farewell and replaced with Phantoms in 1983.

Andy says the aircraft would be displayed in a similar fashion to the Phantom F4 at the Mount Pleasant passenger terminal.

"Hopefully the private sector and FIG will be able to financially support this worthy project in securing a piece of Falklands history and placing it at Stanley airport as a very fitting tribute to those RAF crews involved in the conflict and also as a potential tourist attraction," he said.

If a willing sponsor can be found to provide the initial amount to secure the aircraft a trust will be formed and other funds raised will repay the sponsor and take care of other related costs to complete the project.

### Councillors, parents and youths to discuss apprenticeships

**PROMPTED** by a letter to *Penguin News* and councillors (September 7 page 3) the councillors responsible for training and apprenticeships are to meet with parents and former students.

They will hold an open meeting to discuss the options available for training and apprenticeships.

Councillors believe an increased commitment to apprenticeships was made in the last budget and Cllr Mike Summers says he and his colleagues are not sure how fully it is understood and "appreciated" in different circles.

Every year for a month or two the problem raises its head said Cllr Summers, "...when serious, proper and legitimate concerns as to whether their child is going to get appropriate employment are voiced by parents and then generally speaking things get sorted out."

There is an apprenticeship scheme in place which funds 15 apprenticeship years at any one time. "...more than we have had in the past," explained Cllr Summers. "It will remain the responsibility of the Training Department to monitor what is happening to students coming out of school who are not going off to college and what is happening in the work place to see that real demands are being fulfilled.

"In addition there is a development that the Education Department are working on with Chichester College to create a second stream of education in the Community School so that at some point at the beginning of GCSEs, students will have the choice of an academic or vocational education."

Taking issue with one of the points made in the article, that young people should be encouraged to work more in the abattoir and windfarm projects. Clir Summers said the abattoir has taken on a number of local people of various ages over the last four to five years and trained them in a variety of skills.

"Although there is not a formal apprenticeship there is a fair amount of training that goes on there," he commented, adding that this is also the case in other sectors and businesses, where training takes place that is not associated with an apprenticeship.

### Funding secured for Jasons management plan

FUNDING has been granted for the development of management plans for the important wildlife islands of Steeple and Grand Jason.

Through the Overseas Territories Environment Programme (OTEP). Falklands Conservation has secured funding for the development of the plans, with assistance from Wildlife Conservation Society.

Isaac Forster of Falklands Conservation described Steeple Jason as one of the most "spectacular" sites in the Falklands, "...holding the largest breeding population of the endangered black-browed albatross in the world as well as a significant population of the vulnerable rockhopper penguin."

In addition to these two species Grand Jason holds an important population of the endemic Cobb's Wren. "...a species that is particularly sensitive to disturbance from introduced rodents," he said.


In total the two islands are the breeding grounds for seven globally threatened or near-threatened taxa.

which qualifies them as an important bird area, or IBA under Birdlife International defined criteria.

Integral to the production of the management plans will be a two day workshop held between members of Wildlife Conservation Society, the owners of the islands, and local stakeholders in government, tourism and conservation.

"This will ensure the development of a co-ordinated document prioritising research areas, tourist zones, and procedures to ensure protection of these sites." Isaac explained.

He added that the management plan will also be the first time that a site which is not designated as a National Nature Reserve has been open to full public consultation within the Falklands, "...and will provide a valuable learning experience that could potentially be applied to other significant privately owned areas within the islands."

### Wool market report for week ending September 14, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices increased quite appreciably at sales last week. The only exception in Australia was very broad 32 micron fleece wool which slipped in price by 1 p/kg clean.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, price increases were between 1 and 20 pence per kilogram clean.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up approximately 13 p/kg clean at 380.1 p/kg clean compared to the previous weeks closing level of 367.5 pence per kilogram clean.

Buying interest was mixed, however Chinese activity was relatively subdued on the back of continuing concern over import quotas.

In Australia last week 92.5% of the 50,083 bales offered to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 4,189 bales of crossbred wool of which 84 % were sold. In South Africa 98% of the 8,460 bales on offer were purchased.

Next week over 70,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in South Africa, Australia and New Zealand. Note:



# Ferry's arrival may be delayed

THE new ferry vessel, *Concordia Bay*, is not expected to arrive within its target date of February 2008.

Detailed discussions regarding the works required to convert the *Concordia Bay* for carrying passengers have been taking place with the Maritime and Coastguard Agency (MCA) in recent weeks.

The vessel's owners. Workboat Services Ltd, say that during the discussions it became clear that, "...due to changes in the interpretation of regulations," some steel work additional to that anticipated would be required. "Some of this work is technically challenging and the company is now discussing the situation with the yard which will do the work and with the Falkland Islands Government."

This unexpected development may now delay the arrival of the vessel in the Falklands until after February 2008 but the company says it is, "...doing everything possible to avoid this," and that further information will be made available as soon as the ongoing discussions have been completed.

In a statement released this week, Workboat Services expressed its pleasure at Executive Council's decision on the location of the West Falkland ferry terminal.

"The temporary ramp at Port Howard will impose limitations on the level of service possible in the interim but the Second Creek terminal, as designed by the Public Works Department with breakwaters to north and south, will provide a good berth for the safe and efficient operation of the service."

# Racecourse secured for next 15 years

THE historic Stanley Racecourse will play host to the popular Christmas horse racing and fun events for at least the next 15 years.

The government (FIG) and the Falkland Islands Company (FIC) announced on Wednesday that they have reached agreement on a land exchange which will result in the whole of the racecourse site being under government ownership.

In exchange for the FIC-owned section of the racecourse and adjacent paddock (approximately 21.4 acres). FIG has agreed to convey to FIC two parcels of land measuring approximately 23.7 acres.

One parcel of land is situated on the By-Pass Road near to and west of the FIPASS junction, and the other is situated on the north side of the By-Pass Road adjacent to the MPA Road near Sapper Hill.

As part of the arrangement, FIG has agreed not to develop the racecourse area for a period of 15 years. Additionally, FIG has agreed to provide to FIC grants for the provision of infrastructure in accordance with the recently agreed housing strategy, if FIC develop any of the land they will acquire for housing.

Holder of the lands portfolio. Councillor Richard Davies, said that this subsidy is available to any private land owner who may wish to, "develop housing sites and sell on" and creates a, "level playing field" between the private sector and FIG.

FIC General Manager Roger Spink said the company has been taking advice on how both areas might best be developed.

Top jockey Tim Bonner was relieved the future of the racecourse was secure, and added that he hoped it would never be developed.

"If the venue had been shifted it would have been the end of racing," said Tim, who believes the racecourse is sited "in the best possible place" for all to enjoy.

Neil Watson, who has clocked up many miles on both horse and foot on the course is "delighted" an agreement has been reached but added that everyone, including the Stanley Sports Association (SSA) was "well aware" that the former lease expired in 2006 and, "...it should have been sorted much earlier." *Continued on page 3.* 

# Men remanded in police custody

TWO men were remanded in police custody overnight on Wednesday.

The pair, who cannot be named, were arrested following "extremely serious" allegations, Crown Counsel Julia Krachling-Smith told the court.

At a hearing on Wednesday afternoon, the prosecution requested reporting restrictions, asking that the defendants were not named for fear it could lead to the identification of their alleged victims.

They were remanded in custody until Thursday afternoon when a further application to hold them for longer was made.

Ms Kraehling-Smith said she was seeking an extension because the allegations made against the two men are at the, "...top end of sexual assault," and require extensive police investigation.

Interviews with the complainants have revealed another potential perpetrator and further potential victims, said Ms Krachling-Smith.

At the time of publication, however, the legalities of the application were still being considered by the court.

# Agreement on Camp telephones is 'close'

THE government says it is "close" to reaching an agreement on the replacement telephone system for Camp, following a series of meetings with Cable and Wireless South Atlantic Ltd.

Councillor Mike Summers revealed that the new system will provide a full telephone and broadband service to Camp similar to that provided to Stanley at the same rates. "The service will extend to all parts of the Camp including islands," he said and added that the government hopes a full announcement, which includes the technical and commercial parameters of the agreement, can be made shortly.

Acknowledging that this still leaves a number of questions unanswered, Cllr Summers added, "...until fuller contract terms are agreed between the parties it would be inappropriate to say any more. Nevertheless Cable and Wireless are confident that the current system can be maintained until the changeover is made."

THE projected cost of the terminal at Second Creek prompted a fair few whistles and rolling of eyes around the place at the weekend. A million for Newhaven seemed fairly steep but nigh on two for the West terminal is quite astounding.

As someone suggested to me last week, it sounds as though Workboat Services outlined the type of construction they would ideally like to see and government simply took that and went with it, instead of looking into a more cost effective compromise. Surely there must be a cheaper solution?

It really does seem an extraordinary cost, and must be another source of wonderment to those in the tourism industry so desperate to see investment come their way.

Many are concerned we will go the way of Grand Cayman, who have suffered a drop of more than 10% in tourist numbers after their government failed to invest in necessary infrastructure.

A newspaper from the territory recently reported, "The fact that the Cayman Islands is the only remaining Caribbean cruise ship destination without modern port infrastructure and amenities, including berthing facilities, has caused concerns among people involved in promoting the Cayman Islands as a cruise ship destination. They point out that studies have shown ports with berthing facilities experience a great economic contribution from the cruise industry." Their concerns have a familiar ring.

The Cayman Islands are facing up to the fact they have lost their unique appeal and are becoming, "just another Caribbean destination". We could go the same way, losing money to mainland ports, unless we come up with more to make cruise visits more appealing - and that requires investment.

But I digress. We can hope that by opting for the temporary jetty at Port Howard the government is essentially buying time for the reconsideration of the design - and subsequent expense - of Second Creek and this may lead to a reduced bill.

When the jetty at Port Howard was destroyed in a storm, replacement costs of around a quarter of a million pounds were bandied about. However the managers of Port Howard took the task in hand and produced an adequate jetty for a fraction of the price.

Dare we hope a similar approach will eventually be adopted for Second Creek?

THE role of 'Leader of Government Business' under the councillors' proposed new portfolio system is, "not a Chief Minister by another name," Councillor Summers asserts.

Instead, he says, it is part of a system of portfolios which, "decentralises decision making."

As part of the revision process of portfolios, councillors have been considering whether or not there should be elected leadership in the Falklands. Cllr Summers explains: "The alternatives are to return to a periodically rotating chairman/spokesman, or to have a spokesman with no additional responsibilities/duties.

In the early part of this council there was a view that the monthly rotation in which every councillor had a go at being spokesman/chairman for the month was confusing for the public and government staff, and was inefficient. It created no focus and no real co-ordination of activity.

"We decided therefore to have a government spokesman who is the permanent Chair of General Purposes Committee and co-ordinates and organises non-portfolio issues. This seems to have worked reasonably well, but falls short of real leadership."

During the most recent discussions about the portfolio system, Cllr Summers says, there was a view that there should be a Leader of Government Business, "...whose job it would be to act as spokesman, prepare for and chair meetings with councillors, and to co-ordinate activity between councillors where required. There will be another discussion about this before it is adopted one way or the other."

Cllr Summers has been a supporter of the concept for years: in his manifestos for both the 2005 and 2001 elections he proposed the selection of a Leader of Government Business from among the Executive Councillors.

He is adamant the role is not simply a Chief Minister in disguise. "We do not have a ministerial system, and the proposed amendments to the Constitution do not provide for one, and there cannot therefore be a Chief Minister. Nor is it intended that the Leader of Government Business should become a focus of attention or the prime decision maker.

"The system of portfolios we have devised with chairs separated from Executive Council was devised in part to decentralise decision making, not concentrate it."

The key role of the Leader of Government Business, he says, "...is to co-ordinate people and issues in the most efficient way possible, as well as to continue to speak on behalf of Government on policy issues.

"It is considered a logical progression in the development of internal self government, which does not preclude moving further in the future."

RICHARD Hines was licensed as Rector of the Falkland Islands at an emotive service in Norwich Cathedral on Sunday.

At the beginning of the service a message of welcome from Christ Church Cathedral Council, based on Psalm 139, 'From the seas on the other side of the world' was read by the Bishop for the Falkland Islands, and Revd Hines was presented by David Healey of recruiting sponsors, the Intercontinental Church Society.

During the course of an encouraging address, Bishop Stephen Venner said that Revd Hines was not leaving the UK because his ministry was, "in a mess," but because he had a genuine call – attested by the large congregation from his former Coastal Group of Parishes, Norfolk, which had turned out to wish him well.

# Your questions answered

**O** WHAT is the law in the Falklands in relation to the importation of breeds of dogs known to be dangerous, in particular Rottweillers and Pit **Bull Terriers?** 

Senior Veterinary Officer Vic Epstein provided the following information.

A Under the Falkland Islands Customs Ordinance (import prohibitions) it is an offence to import any animal except under a licence from the Department of Agriculture.

There is no specific Falkland Islands law determining what type of dog (or any other domestic animal) may or may not be imported. Therefore with regards to 'dangerous dogs' the Veterinary Department follows the UK Dangerous Dogs Act.

Under the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991 it is an offence to own or breed any of the following types of dog: Pit Bull Terrier, Japanese

Tosa, Dogo Argentino and Fila Brasileiro and anyone importing such a type of dog would be denied an import licence.

Under Section 3 of the 1991 Act it is an offence (against the owner) for a dog of any type to be dangerously out of control in a public place or a non-public place in which it is not permitted to be. Under Falkland Islands law, the

Dogs Ordinance (Title 5.2) states that if it appears to the court that a dog is dangerous and not kept under proper control, the court may order that the dog be kept under proper control or be destroyed

Racecourse secured for next 15 years | Man attempts to break in to jail

LATE last Saturday night the police had to deal with a most unusual scenario: a man attempting to get in to the prison.

A 25-year old Stanley man was discovered in the rear exercise yard of the prison after noises were heard by the duty station officer.

The police say access to the prison building itself was not gained as the exercise yard door was securely locked and prisoners were confined within the cell complex for the night.

Having climbed into the exercise yard it was apparent to the officers dealing with the incursion that the man was unable to climb back out. After initial questioning he was escorted from the exercise yard and will be formally interviewed later this week with a view to facing charges for an offence under the Prison Ordinance.

Superintendent Paul Elliott said the incident was highly unusual. "I am accustomed to people attempting to break out of a prison rather than trying to get in," he said.

"The fact that a person was able to get into the prison yard is a matter of concern, however 1 am pleased to report that current security provisions ensured no contact was made with any prisoner and the prison building itself was not compromised." He added that the matter is being treated, "very seriously.

"Security is being reviewed and I envisage that charges against the intruder will be brought in due course," he said.

Improvements to the prison building, which is attached to the rear of Stanley Police Station, are due to commence within the next few months. "When complete it will bring

security and accepted modern standards into what is effectively a Victorian jail," said Superintendent Elliot.

### Strong Argentine objection anticipated to underwater territory extension

THE possibility of the Falklands' underwater territory being extended has sparked a strong reaction from Argentina.

President Nestor Kirchner told the United Nations on Tuesday that his country would strongly reject any proposals from the UK to expand the continental platform boundary to the east of the Falklands. He also made reference to Britain's "obstinate reluctance" to talk with Argentina over the Falkland Islands sovereignty, adding that it is " incompressible." "It's time the United Kingdom

put an end to the anachronism of retaining an occupation dating back to colonial times," said President Kirchner who described the current Falklands situation as "illegal," particularly when 174 years have gone by since the, "...usurpation of Argentine territory.

A new law to extend underwater territory from the current 200 miles from the coast line to 350 miles is due to come into force in a few years, time. It is expected to provoke a scramble for underwater land almost as fierce as the one for Africa in the 19th century when European countries divided up the continent between them. In total as much as 2.7 million square miles (an area similar in size to Australia), is believed to be at stake

Claims can be submitted to the United Nations before the deadline runs out in May 2009.

Argentina's strong stance comes just a few days after the British press revealed that London might want to expand claims in the South Atlantic seabed, including round the Falklands

The Guardian reported on Friday that the UK was considering the possibility of territorial claims not only around the Falklands, but also Ascension Island and Rockall.

a tiny uninhabited rock 200 miles of the Scottish coast, in the hope of, "...annexing potentially lucrative gas, mineral and oil fields." However a spokesperson for the

British Embassy in Buenos Aires has played down the British press reports saying that as far as submit-ting a claim to the UN, "...no decisions have been made.

This is not a new issue; we have already had useful contacts on the matter with the Argentine Foreign Ministry. Meetings took place in 2001 and 2004. Earlier this year we proposed a further meeting, which we hope will happen because it will be another example of cooperation with Argentina in areas of mutual interest in the South Atlantic." he insisted.

Over the weekend the Sunday Telegraph reported that the Foreign Office insisted there was no certainty that the bid, being prepared by the UK Hydrographic Of-fice, would go ahead. "We are considering the possibility of making a submission to the UN Commission on the Limits of the Continental Shelf, but no firm decision has been taken yet," said a spokesperson.

In spite of President Kirchner's strong words, Foreign Affairs minister Jorge Taiana said in New York that Argentina would not make any official protest (on the seabed expansion) as long as there is no offipresentation from the UK. Councillor Mike Summers was cial

quoted by the British press as saying, "The UN Commission, would not issue any final, binding decision, on the matter, as long as the ownership of the Falklands was in dispute.

Councillor Andrea Clausen who holds the portfolio for mineral resources reiterated that the requirement for coastal states to submit

200 nautical miles from the base lines from which the breadth of the territorial sea is measured. Since then all coastal states have known they must make a case for their claim before May 2009 and the UK has been gathering technical information to make its case for a number of years.

'There is the option to make a joint submission, and there is a possibility that Britain and Argentina may wish to do this," said Cllr Clausen.

"However, in the event that a joint submission cannot be made the UK may wish to make a sub-mission in its own right and the fact that there is an outstanding dispute between the costal states may result in a very protracted process prior to a final outcome being reached by the Commission.

'If no submission is made then the opportunity to extend the continental shelf limits will be lost forever," concluded Cllr Clausen.

### New 3D survey planned in South Basin

HYDROCARBON exploration company Borders and Southern has announced a new phase of seismic survey work.

This week the company announced that it has signed a seismic agreement with Petroleum Geo-Services (PGS) to conduct a 3D survey within its South Falklands Basin Production Licences.

In a statement released on Monday, the company says the agreement represents, "...the most extensive 3D seismic study ever conducted in this area."

The 3D survey area will measure approximately 1,500 sq km and will be located over some of the company's high-graded leads that were identified on earlier 2D seismic data.

"The 3D will provide detailed information on the reservoir distribution and structural integrity of the leads and will allow the company to assess some of the amplitude anomalies associated with the structures." the company said.

"Ultimately the 3D will allow the company to rank its prospects and define drilling locations."

PGS will be using its vessel Ocean Explorer, with six solid streamers, to acquire the survey. It is anticipated that the survey will commence in October this year and, depending on weather conditions, last approximately four months. Subscription agreement

Borders and Southern also an-

nounced this week that it has signed a subscription agreement with PGS under which PGS has subscribed for 16.656.670 new ordinary shares of 1 pence each in the company to raise \$10 million.

The subscription price was 30p per share. Following the subscription, there will be 194,344,170 ordinary shares outstanding in the company which will result in PGS holding 8.57% of the total.

Chief Executive Howard Obee commented, "We're delighted to have signed a seismic agreement with one of the world's leading geophysical services companies at a price we believe to be competitive.

"This is a large and complex 3D survey which will allow us to fully evaluate some of the exciting prospects that have been identified on our 2D data. We're also very pleased that PGS have been sufficiently impressed by our acreage that it has chosen to subscribe for a material equity stake in the company. We look forward to a fruitful working relationship with our new partners."

### Non-FCO appointment to Governor 'not unusual'

THE appointment of non-Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) man Andrew Gurr as Governor of St Helena is not unusual, the Acting Governor of the Falklands says.

Last week *Penguin News* reported former Chief Executive Mr Gurr's appointment and the fact that he has no work experience within the FCO.

Paul Martinez said is not unusual for the FCO to advertise widely for a post when certain specialist skills or circumstances are required. He commented, "The Governorship of St Helena was widely advertised in the national press and was decided by open competition. On completion of this process, it was considered that Andrew Gurr possessed the requisite skills and experience in both the public and commercial sectors to fill the position."

Mr Gurr is expected to take up his posting as Governor in St Helena in November 2007.

### World Cup interrupted service: sMt Maria transmitter to blame

THE breaks in television coverage which caused upset among rugby fans at the weekend are down to the problems with a transmitter on West Falkland.

Penguin News reported last week that SSVC engineers had been working on the transmitter and the work is continuing. World Cup rugby coverage was disrupted on both Saturday and Sunday afternoons last weekend.

Broadcasting Service station manager at Mount Pleasant said it is down to the, "...pretty serious problem," with the transmitter at Mount Maria.

He commented, "We have an engineer up there right now, working to prevent any further outages. The transmitter is 13 years old, and in human years I think that makes it an OAP!"

Aidan said he was hopeful there will be no further outages.

### How is £3m for terminals justified?

HOW depressing last weeks issue was for West Falkland residents and the taxpayer....

So, as could be predicted, the fat Falkland sheep with pockets loaded with taxpayers money, is about to wade into the shark infested waters of Newhaven and Second Creek. How on earth can anyone justify the expenditure of three million pounds on two ferry terminals? In my opinion what FIG should do, for instance, on West Falkland, is invite the various people who made White Rock Ltd work so well on the roads to come up with a proposal with a cap of £100,000 on expenditure, and see what happens.

The other depressing item was the news about Camp telephones - or should that be the absence of them?

It is disgraceful that Cable and Wireless, aided and abetted by our government should be able to adopt the dog in the manger attitude towards anyone who wants to provide himself with a service that they are not prepared to give. It is now possible to set up an always on broadband internet and phone link to the world for a very reasonable sum of money.

How much longer do Camp residents have to put up with a stone age service at gold plated prices?

Sunday ... Again two matches to be broadcast on BFBS1. Just as the match is about to begin, coverage is lost, yet again, for another couple of hours.


So infuriating for a long-time



### Inquest opened into disappearance of seaman

AN inquest into the death of a man who disappeared at Mare Harbour two years ago has been opened and adjourned.

Her Majesty's Coroner, Miss Alison Thompson, on Friday, formally opened the inquest into the death of Liverpuddlian Anthony Albert McClelland on or about November 26, 2005. The body of the crewman from MV Indomitable was never recovered.

At the hearing on Friday, September 21, Inspector Len McGill gave evidence about the search for the disappeared man. He said a report was received on the morning of November 26, that Mr lands Supreme Court ruled that Mr Blanch and other Falklands "bigwigs" had behaved in an illegal manner for improper motives, says the article.

It continues: "By the time of the ruling, however, Blanch had left the Falklands and was working as a consultant reporting on ways of transforming Swansea council to its chief executive, Tim Thorogood....

"Last year Tim Thorogood resigned as chief executive of Swansea after a scandal about how he managed to get planning permission at his home on the Gower Peninsula for a garage that looked uncannily like a luxury bungalow (*Eye 1152*). Dr Blanch meanwhile is to quietly return to the Falklands this summer following the departure of yet another chief executive, to act as interim chief exec until a permanent replacement could be found.

"The vacancy is now filled. Tim Thorogood takes over in January. Small world isn't it?" is the parting comment by the magazine.

McClelland could not be found on board the *Indomitable*.

Cursory searches were carried out and a full scale search of Mare Harbour, Mount Pleasant and the road and camp in between was held. All the crew were spoken to and it was established that Mr McClelland was seen the previous night at almost midnight, as he prepared to leave a club. He was not seen again.

Inspector McGill was of the opinion that Mr McClelland had, in all probability, fallen into the water at Mare Harbour.

The inquest was adjourned and is likely to resume within a month.

# The Falklands Black-Browed albatross population: could our fishery be assisting it?

By lan Strange AMIDST all the doom and gloom in the media coverage on the plight of albatross populations and their apparent decline around the world, is there a brighter picture for the Falkland population? Birdlife International by launch-

ing their "Year of the Albatross" did a wonderful job in bringing to the at-tention of the world, the plight of the albatross. A lot of effort has gone into designing and improving methods to reduce albatross mortality in the longlining fishing industry. Mitigation and practical control measures have yielded impressive results and the Falkland fishery is one of the leaders in this field. However, I wonder if we have not been a little over zealous, or too anxious to gain the emotions of the public on the question of the supposed declining albatross in these Is-lands, and should we have looked at our particular situation in more depth?

A lot of conservation strategy today is about getting the emotions of the public on board. It seems that to do this, things have to be in danger or decline, for good news will rarely hit the front pages. Perhaps the following will bring a little light and a new dimension to the question of albatross populations declining in the Falkland Islands and the conflict with the fish-

### Aerial surveying of Black-browed albatross

For a period of 43 years I have been carrying out aerial photographic surveys of albatross colonies in the Falklands. The first was made of Beauchene Island in 1964, and I have continued to use the same basic methodology to monitor albatross populations since. The results of an Island-wide survey made in 1986, and a more recent one made in 2005, have been brought together and are com-

pared in a recently completed report; Aerial Surveys of Black-browed Albatross Breeding Colonies in the Falk-land Islands: The Methodology Employed and Comparisons with Aerial Surveys carried out in 1986-2005-2006. Both surveys covered all twelve albatross breeding sites found in the Falkland Islands. The results show that the Falkland Black-browed albatross population has actually been increasing since 1986, and stable in late 2006

The report presents an element of pioneering in the surveying of albatross populations in the Falkland Islands. In certain respects it challenges the value and accuracy of some other survey systems, attempts to show the value of photographic aerial surveying and to demonstrate the methodology employed. Presenting a total breeding population for the Falkland Islands was not the aim of the report, but to support the need to reconsider some survey methods generally used.

In my earlier surveys, there was no set agenda - the aims were simply to record breeding populations of this species in the Islands, largely for personal interests as a naturalist. Much of the data from these surveys was filed away and not analysed in detail. Only in recent years when the focus on albatross populations was becoming a major topic, was it apparent that the results of these earlier surveys were of significant value and needed analysing in more detail.

Population data has been collected for one colony on the New Island reserve for the last 29 years, and as such is the only long-term data set for the Falkland Islands. This data clearly shows that the Black-browed albatross population at this site has increased over this period by 101%, (see the recently published work covering New Island's conservation ef-forts: New Island, Falkland Islands -A South Atlantic Wildlife Sanctuary Methods and equipment for Conservation Management, New Island Conservation Trust, 2007).

Data from other sites in the vicinity of New Island also show increases in their populations. To level the criticism that such sites are not representative of larger colonies, an all-Island survey was carried out in 2005. This survey was multi purpose, with three of its objectives being as follows:

(a) In the light of the generally eported decline of the Black-browed albatross in the Islands, to present data which places a new dimension on reported declines.

(b) To produce data to encourage the development of a survey system, with methodology considered more accurate for the particular environment and terrain of the Falkland Islands

(c) To present comparative results in the form of aerial photographic images and data from three main surveys: 1986, 2005 and 2006. Also to present data from secondary surveys made of "sample areas" taken from major breeding sites.

Aerial survey methods have their difficulties and constraints. A degree of photographic expertise is needed to obtain the quality of imagery. However, taking into consideration the difficulties of carrying out ground surveys, the physical problems which can be encountered in traversing sites used by Black-browed albatross in these Islands, aerial surveys have no more constraints than ground surveys, and present a more suitable method with higher degree of accuracy.

Aerial photographic surveys will not give all of the data sometimes needed. One must be aware of the limitations of this system and use it accordingly. This survey was aimed at producing a figure for potential adult breeding birds. In my experience, unless a census is carried out when adult birds first return to the nesting sites. an accurate figure is impossible to obtain. Surveys carried out late in the breeding season, for example after hatching, have to introduce

Methods and equipment For many years I have used a con-ventional medium format Rollei 6x6 camera for aerial photography, which, when used in optimum conditions, produces excellent imagery. The development of the 35mm digital camera does however allow more flexibility and is an important new tool in aerial survey photography.

Two methods were employed to produce images for counting and comparison. One employed conventional darkroom techniques where 12x14 inch photographic prints were produced. The second method employed digital photographs and a PC system. Digital images originating from a Canon EOS IDs with a resolution of II mega pixels, were taken in RAW format to obtain the highest quality, then printed as high definition images measuring 13x19 inches. Using set methodology, hard copies were then used for counting the albatross on nests. A number of 4x5 inch black and white negatives from my first aerial survey of Beauchene Island in 1964, were also enlarged and printed for comparison. These negatives were professionally scanned at high resolution and digitised for analysis on a PC screen.

The use of a PC, with the combination of high resolution digital photographs and a 24 inch high resolution computer screen, images can be enlarged to such detail that it allows the easy identification of individual birds, and detail, such as the size of their nests. Detail proving to be particularly important in showing that a high percentage of birds are occupying recently formed nests. To aid counting, a grid overlay is applied to each image on the screen, using Adobe Photoshop. Each bird is then marked off with a coloured dot as it is counted. Examples and results

In the main report the results are presented in two forms: tables of figures, and visual. The latter uses a selection of aerial images to illustrate the methodology, the variation in the colonies terrain and a series of comparative images from the 1986 and

2005 surveys to show the increases recorded for nesting pairs. The re-port shows the increases, given in both port shows the increases, given in both numbers and percentage values, found on every breeding site in the Falkland Islands, but not a total Island popula-

tion. To illustrate and check the reliability of aerial photography survey methodology, individual plates were selected from the 1986 and 2005 surveys. Using landmarks to identify specific sections of a colony on sets of matching images from both years, areas were delineated and using the same method as for counting whole images, these areas were effectively re-counted. What this 'sampling' method showed was the considerable variation in density of nesting birds from one area to another - sampled areas containing one to two thousand birds showed population increases varying from 21% to as much as [41%. Sample areas also showed clear evidence of population decreases to a few specific sites; one on Bird Island and two on Beauchene Island, yet the overall populations for these islands show increases. Sampling by aerial photography improved the methodology through its ability to cover all types of terrain.

Results for overall population per-centage increases in pairs of albatross also varied considerably between sites. For example, the Elephant Jason Island population, second smallest in the Islands, had the lowest total increase: 11.8% in the period 1986 to 2005. One of its two colonies was the only example found in the 2005 survey that showed a decrease in its population, with a 4.2% fall over the twenty year period.

However, on the South Jason Island colony lying less than 5 km away from the Elephant Jason colonies, the survey found the highest increase in the Islands with a figure of 323.4%. This colony is small, but significant for its population trends. In the 1940's the colony had an estimated size of 200 pairs (Roddy Napier). In 1983 a ground count gave a total of just 366 pairs, increasing to 1,550 pairs by 2005.

Steeple Jason Island, the largest colony of breeding Black-browed al-batross in the Falklands, has shown an increase of 33.412 pairs, in a 90% sample only, between 1986 and 2005. This is a 46.5% increase, giving an average annual increase of 2.3% over the twenty years. On Grand Jason Island the increase of birds on nests was 21,485 or an overall increase of 63.7%.


Other colonies such as North Island have shown similar increases over the same time span: 7,891 pairs or 52%. Bird Island surveys show an increase of 3,989 pairs or 34.5%; the second lowest increase to Elephant ason Island. Beauchene Island shows increase of 52.3% between 1983 and 2005

All of these results are presented in full detail in the written report pre-viously mentioned. Based on visual data and data and covering a considerable time span, these surveys record the detail, the position and the number of birds

connection In the mid 1980's the Falkland population of Rockhopper penguins saw a sudden and massive decline. Rockhopper penguins in the Falklands are commonly associated with Blackbrowed albatross, nesting both on the fringes and mixed with the nesting albatross. The decline of this penguin species could bring about the largest error factor in the ground surveying of Black-browed albatross. Aerial photographs taken before and after the decline of these penguins, clearly illustrate how large areas once occupied by Rockhopper penguins, have now been grown over by Tussac grass. The 1986 and 2005 aerial photo-

graphs clearly show there is a very substantial increase in tussac, effectively reducing the total colony areas seen, for example, in the 1986 photographs. However, these images also show that this encroachment is largely confined to where colonies of Rockhopper penguins originally nested

lands.

sites.

In the light of the huge amount of publicity directed at the issue of alba-tross stocks world wide, with emphasis on declines in albatross species, the results here may be viewed as controversial and not assisting in calls for better protection of the species. There will be concerns that these find-

### Conclusion

The final analysis of photographs used in aerial surveys of this type, is unquestionably time consuming. In this survey alone over one thousand hours were spent preparing and counting images. However, aerial photog-raphy presents visual evidence that cannot be disputed, and is by far the most accurate for the survey of Blackbrowed albatross in the Falkland Is-

ings may influence the work being put into mitigation and measures to reduce albatross mortality in the commercial fishery. On the contrary, conservationists and the fishing industry should welcome such news, for surely it indicates that these measures have been successful, and that perhaps the value of the fishery to the Falkland albatross population has been underestimated. The Islands' commercial fishery could well be the reason for the increase in this species, due to the large amount of fishery discard which it is known the albatross take. However, ultimately it is important to recognise the need for continued strict monitoring and regulating of fishing industry, for should our fishery col-lapse, then the Islands will surely see a real decline in its Black-browed albatross population.

### Plants and animal life survived ice ages

SPRINGTAILS, mites, worms and plant life could help solve the mystery of Antarctica's glacial history according to new research published in the journal *Science* this week.

Scientists from British Antarctic Survey (BAS) and Massey University in New Zealand report that of the evolutionary history of Antarctica's terrestrial plant and animal life does not reconcile with current reconstructions of past glacial ice extent going back more than 23 million years.

In today's warm period less than one percent of Antarctica is ice-free. It has been assumed that during ice ages there was insufficient ice-free land for Antarctic plant and animal species to survive and evolve. However scientists report that an exceptional long-term evolutionary persistence, isolation, and a striking capability to survive global climate change, appear to be the 'norm' rather than the exception for the terrestrial world.

Pete Convey of BAS said. "Because these groups of invertebrates, plants and microbes occupy such a tiny part of a huge continent climate scientists have tended to ignore them. But recent advances in molecular biology and biogeography show us that they are indeed significant when you are trying to reconstruct a picture of the Earth's glacial history.

"It is important now for us to work together with scientists from all disciplines to integrate this new biological evidence in glaciological and climate models. It will help answer the big global questions about past and future climate change and be a valuable contribution to International Polar Year 2007-2008."

### Uruguay is among top ten greenest countries

Uruguay is South America's most environmentally friendly country. According to a list published by *Readers' Digest* Uruguay and Australia are the only couries from the Southern Hemisphere to rank among the world's top ten greenest and most livable.

Australia ranks in position eight, Uruguay is ninth in the 141-nation world ranking that has Finland in first place followed by Iceland, Norway, Sweden, Austria, Switzerland, Ireland, Australia, Uruguay and Denmark.

United States. Britain and Argentina appear in the positions 23, 25 and 27 respectivley.

The *Readers Digest* ranking is a combination of the United Nations Human Development Index and the

2005 Sustainable Development Index jointly produced by the US universities of Yale and Columbia and the World Economic Forum.

The two indexes monitor the evolution of indicators influencing environmental sustainability in the development of different countries. Some of them refer to such things as quality of the air, water and soil which have a direct impact on quality of life. The others show whether a country acts in a civic manner regarding growing threats to the environment.

Top-ranked Finland wins high marks for air and water quality, a low incidence of infant disease, and how well it protects citizens from water pollution and natural disasters. *MP*

### Wool market report for week ending September 21, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices increased quite appreciably for the second week running at sales in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, price increases were between 16 and 26 pence per kilogram clean for fleece wool lots finer than 24 micron and between 2 and 10 p/kg clean for broader fleece wool lots.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up approximately 18 p/kg clean at 398.7 p/kg clean compared to the previous weeks closing level of 380.1 pence per kilogram clean.

Buying interest was strong with renewed Chinese activity evident.

Analysts suggested that increased demand fueled the price increases and that the increased demand flowed from wool supply concerns for the coming months.

In Australia last week 95% of the 53,181 bales offered to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 4.436 bales of crossbred wool of which 91 % were sold. Good clearances were also reported from New Zealand and South Africa. Next week approximately 80,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in South Africa, Australia and New Zealand.

TravelMart has earned a reputation for quality and results, pri-marily because it features the exclusive William H Coleman Inc 'Select Match Pre-Scheduled Appointments System' that enables 'buyers' and 'suppliers' to have up to twenty 20-minute business appointments per day.

Both suppliers and buyers have to lodge their meeting requests in advance of the event, and meetings are only prearranged for, "perfect match requests " Sally commented, "This means that no time is wasted in meetings with operators looking for, for example, beach holidays or five-star luxury travel

"We only meet with operators who have a genuine interest in what the Falklands has to offer, and



whose clientele are a likely market for our product.

Sally said she found it particularly useful to follow up on some of the contacts made by Liz Dimmlich from the Tourist Board during her recent trip to Australia and New Zealand, targeting operators who sell the Latin American product. Sally explained, "These operators already had a basic knowledge of the Falklands product as a result of Liz's presentations, and found it useful to discuss the finer details of selling and booking the Islands with a local operator. Of course for ITT it was an opportunity to sell themselves as the operators 'Falklands agent' when they introduce the product into their catalogue.

This "proactive targeting" is the next best thing to a familiarisation

trip for overseas operators, Sally felt, and already has a proven record she met with a number of existing London-based contacts whilst at tending the Falklands Forum in ...and the number of book-April. ings from those operators has already increased significantly as they are now more confident in selling the Islands.

With fierce competition from the big sellers such as Chile, Peru and Argentina and from up and coming countries such as Nicaragua, Panama and Colombia ("whose governments, in conjunction with their respective Tourist Boards, have invested greatly in promoting their country on a global basis but par-ticularly in UK"). Sally believes the Falklands have to strive hard to retain operator contracts and create

new ones. "One year of bad sales could result in an operator pulling the Falklands from their product line and not featuring us in their brochures or on websites. Figures released by LATA (the Latin American Tourism Association) show very clearly the beneficial effects that government-sponsored effective and eatchy promotion can have in increasing overall visitor numbers to a country."

She added. "Developing new contacts and retaining contracts is further hindered by our lack of a wholesale operation (which could be overcome relatively easily with the introduction of across-the-board commission system), as buyers struggle to see how they can be competitive in selling the Falklands product if it is cheaper for the client to book directly at source than through an operator in their home country (who in turn will book with an operator in the Falklands).

The lack of a second flight between the Islands and Chile is also limiting. Whilst the wealth of attractions in Patagonia is a magnet for attracting visitors to our area, the Islands have to do the hard-sell to entice people to the Falklands for a whole week.

Sally commented, "If only 1 could secure one more booking for every time an operators said. 'it would be much easier if there was a mid week flight' our visitors numbers would already be hugely increased!"
