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New comms deal for Camp New service and broadband to be in place by end of 2009

A DEAL has been signed between the government and Cable and Wireless to provide Camp with a new and upgraded telephone service, offering broadband, from mid to late 2009.

Following recent meetings between representatives of the government and the telecommunications company on terms for the replacement of the camp telephone system. Heads of Understanding were signed by the parties in the Secretariat yesterday afternoon.

The government has agreed that the date on which the fiveyear notice under the exclusive licence can be given will be extended from the end of 2007 until the end of 2014 and says it is satisfied that a continued exclusive licence is, "...in the best interests of the Falkland Islands population." Aaron Richardson, a Director

Aaron Richardson, a Director of Cable and Wireless South Atlantic Ltd said the company was pleased to have agreed the Heads of Understanding with the government and an extension to the licence. "We look forward to upgrading the services we currently provide to our customers in the rural

communities of the Falkland Islands."

The government's interim Chief Executive, Dr Michael Blanch, added, "Government is very pleased that agreement has now been reached on the replacement of the Camp telecommunications infrastructure.

"It is extremely important for the future development of Camp to provide good telephone and broadband internet services." *Continued on page 2*

Drilling agreement: 'biggest oil event in 10 years'

A DEAL signed between Falkland Oil and Gas Ltd (FOGL) and giant Australian resources company BHP Billiton has been heralded by members of the South Atlantic hydrocarbons industry as, "...the biggest thing to happen in ten years."

Under the agreement, which applies to FOGL's entire exploration acreage in the Falklands, a minimum of two exploration wells will be drilled in the next three years.

BHP Billiton will acquire a 40% interest, with an option to increase its interest up to 65%, and will take over the operatorship of the licences.

FOGL says the entry of BHP Billiton, a company with extensive deepwater exploration experience, into their licences, "...confirms our view of the significant petroleum potential of the South and East Falkland Basins."

Chief Executive of FOGL, Tim Bushell, described the agreement as, "a landmark deal" for the company. "The introduction of a major company as a farm-in partner has been a key strategic objective over the last 18 months and we are delighted to welcome a partner of BHP Billiton's calibre and expertise.

"We are now entering a very exciting phase for FOGL and the Falkland Islands. The results of our recent exploration programme and the introduction of BHP Billiton represent a significant step in realusing the potential of the region."

Mr Bushell is in the Islands for a meeting of the Falklands Joint Operators Group, made up of representatives of all the companies involved in exploration for hydrocarbons in the waters around the Islands, which usually meets in London every two or three months. The meeting in the Falklands is the first to have taken place for several years.

Mr Bushell told *Penguin News* this week that the agreement with BHP Billiton means drilling could begin as early as next summer as the company has its own rigs on long term lease. Rig availability has held up fellow exploration company Desire Petroleum's drilling for a number of years. (See page 4 for an update on Desire's activity.)

Mr Bushell commented, "We've been aware of Desire's problems in getting a rig so we started looking around six or seven months ago and found the same thing they did, that the rig market is very tight, and there are not many available. This deal with BHP changes all that."

Holder of the mineral resources portfolio, Councillor Andrea Clausen, described FOGL's agreement with BHP Billiton as, "...a massive step change." She commented, "This is very

She commented, "This is very exciting news for the Falkland Islands; after almost ten years of being in a steady state this is a massive change of gear upwards for the industry. It has benefits not just for FOGL but the wider industry and Falklands plc."

Royal Marines on Islands exercise

ONE hundred and twenty Royal Marines will be on exercise in the Falklands over the next two weeks.

The men, the majority of whom are reservists, are in the Islands as part of an exercise organised by 1982 veteran Lt Col John Davies RM who was wounded in the assault on Two Sisters Mountain.

He arrived in the Islands early this week with an advance party of around 15 men to set up the exercise, and the remaining Marines arrive on today's airbridge.

Every year the reservists take part in a two week exercise but this is the first to be held in the Falklands. They will head straight to San Carlos from where they will yomp to Onion Range for a week of work. They will be split into two groups and while one group is live firing the other will have a chance to take in the wildlife and participate in battlefield tours.

Depending on how this exercise goes, Lt Col Davies would like the Falklands tour to become a regular part of his men's training. He explained, "Certainly the Royal Marines should maintain their links with the Islands and it's a great place to train."

However, he added that the logistics of such an exercise in the Falklands are complicated and this 'test run' will determine whether it will be considered as a regular training post.

Men back in court today

THE two men arrested last week have been respectively charged with rape of a child and assault of a child.

The continuation of reporting restrictions mean the pair cannot yet be named.

They were both refused bail when they appeared in court on Tuesday morning and will remain in custody until 1.30pm today.

AS Penguin News hits the stands today the Falklands is welcoming 100 or so reserve Royal Marines for exercise Commando Strike.

This is probably the largest contingent of Royal Marines the Islands have played host to since 1982 and it has been with some amusement we've looked back at the difference in reactions to their arrival today, compared to that of the small detachments sent to the Islands in the politically turbulent times leading up to the war.

For the uninitiated, the Royal Marines Naval Party 8901 detachments on their year long posting had a habit of marrying local girls causing much frustration for Falklands men. Whether it was a ploy by the girls, particularly in the 1970s, to escape their home that didn't seem to have much going for it it and which was becoming more and more ignored by Britain, or a retaliatory move by the Marines to get one over the local studs, we can only speculate. One detachment reportedly set sail with 11 of 15 eligible females and there were only 42 Marines!

Former commander of NP8901, Ewen Southby-Tailyour, in his book *Reasons in Writing* gives an amusing (now) account of how, through the letters pages of the *Falkland Islands Times*, a missive he had very little respect for, Islanders began to complain bitterly at the award to the Marines of the Wilkinson Sword of Peace for their community work. This discussion then escalated into a bit of a slanging match between Islanders who supported the award and those who were enraged to see 'our' women folk waving gaily from the back of the four-tonner heading for Moody Brook after 'Glory Hour.'

I hasten to add that many of these Marines have since returned to the Islands and are highly respected members of the community: the trivial incidents of the 1970s are now long forgotten particularly in light of what came in 1982. And, to put the situation into context, if the Marines posed a threat to the local population in the 1970s, the amount of British forces in the Islands over the last 25 years should have finished it off completely! The Falklands is quite simply a much more attractive place to live now with young people wanting to return and settle, not escape.

Lt Col John Davies is in charge of the men arriving today; many will remember him from last November when he retraced the yomp into Stanley. Unfortunately, he didn't get to complete the journey to Stanley in 1982 due to being wounded in the assault on Two Sisters, but he did get to have that beer in the Globe after the long walk nearly 25 years later.

During a visit to the PN office this week, he looked a little startled when we hollered "Lock up your daughters, the Bootnecks are in town," but he could see the funny side when we explained the relevant history.

And times have changed; today the Royal Marines hold a special place in the hearts of Islanders - they are seen as 'our boys'.

Having said that it wouldn't hurt, you local lads, to slap on a bit more Allure, open doors for the ladies and pay for their drinks...the appeal of 'Royal' is probably just as strong as it always was.

New communications deal for Camp

According to a joint statement released last night, the Heads of Understanding contain a number of specifications. Cable and Wireless will manage the telecommunications components of the contract which will include the extension of broadband services into Camp. The capital cost will be shared with FIG contributing £823,000 and Cable and Wireless contributing £1.3m. Any over run to the total capital costs of the project or any savings on costs will be shared in equal proportions.

The government has agreed to fund the cost of road construction to telecommunications sites and manage the contract/s for those works which will be offered for public tender in the near future so that the works can be completed this summer. The government will also fund the initial provision of power supply and ancillary infrastructure, which is expected to cost approximately £1m.

Cable and Wireless has agreed to give an undertaking to the government that they will charge for broadband services in the Islands only on the basis of maximum tariffs agreed during recent meetings, and that those tariffs will not be increased before January 1, 2009. Cable and Wireless and the government will review those tariffs to consider whether any variation "is appropriate" after that date.

According to the joint statement, in relation to the consideration of telecommunications tariffs by the government, Cable and Wireless has, "...helpfully agreed new, detailed, arrangements for the disclosure on an annual and confidential basis," to the government of financial information relating to their business operations in the Falklands.

Cable and Wireless is now working on the technical specifications of the new Camp system for inclusion in a contract document in due course. The main technology to be employed will be WIMAX with the deployment of VSAT (satellite) terminals "at the extremities" to ensure telephone and broadband services throughout Camp.

The company says it is "confident" that services can continue to be provided to Camp by the existing IRT2000 network until the new system is in place.

Ship catches fire en route to Falklands

ALL crew members of Spanish registered trawler *Olagorta* are safe and well following a fire on board the vessel on Sunday in international waters.

Olagorta is owned by Copemar SA and was due to take up a finfish licence in the Falklands Zone this week under charter to Beauchene Fishing Co Ltd.

The vessel first visited the Islands in June this year, when it carried the *Viking Bay's* cargo of South Georgia toothfish to Montevideo.

Teena Ormond of Beauchene Fishing Company explained that some of the crew were working on deck following the transhipment of cargo from the *Playa de Galicia* when smoke and flames were noticed.

She said the fire spread so rapidly there was no time to collect personal belongings or documents, prior to taking to the life rafts.

The Captain, chief engineer and a third officer are on board the *Playa de Galicia*, (owned by Pesmar with joint venture partners Seafish Falklands) which is still in the vicinity of the burning vessel, whilst the remainder of the crew (mostly Peruvians) were taken to Montevideo onboard the *Costa del Cabo* (owned by Walvis Fish and chartered locally by SAMS).

The fire was successfully extinguished on Wednesday night and at the time of going to print the vessel was awaiting a tug from Chile to tow it to Montevideo, Uruguay.

Mrs Ormond said the owners, Captain and crew wished to express their sincere thanks to the owners and crew of the *Costa del Cabo* for their assistance and transporting the crew back to Montevideo, and in particular to the owners and crew of the *Playa de Galicia*, who remain in the vicinity of the *Olagorta*, enabling the Captain and officers to monitor the situation.

"Also thanks to the Fisheries Department, Seamen's Mission and all friends and colleagues in the Falklands who offered support in any way."

BFBS: 'we're still trying to fix things'

FOLLOWING the continued interruptions to the BFBS television service, Engineer Seb Knight has revealed they have been dealing with two separate problems.

One was a cable fault at Sapper Hill which was repaired on the afternoon of September 22 while the other was a fault in a distribution amplifier on September 30/October I which took much longer to locate, but which has now been resolved

Seb is the only Engineer at BFBS at present because the Broadcasting Resources Manager, Stuart Holmes, is on leave until later this month.

He said that as Stuart has a home in Stanley he can monitor on a daily basis the quality of TV reception in Stanley, however, when he is on leave it takes longer for faults to be reported to BFBS at Mount Pleasant

"If anyone becomes aware of widespread reception problems it

would be appreciated if they would please report them as soon as pos-sible to BFBS at Mount Pleasant."

It has been a busy time for BFBS engineering staff as there have also been problems with the TV transmitter on Mount Maria. Owing to its age, this transmitter is not now fully supported by the company which manufactured it but BFBS staff in UK are actively seeking engineering support and spares to ensure its future functionality.

The Falkland Islands Government (FIG) makes a sizeable contribution to the MOD towards the TV service: a sum of £92,250 per annum. This contribution commenced in the 1997/98 financial year at the rate of £75,000.

FIG also provides a house rent-free to the BFBS Engineer as a contribution to annual maintenance costs for the civilian side of the service. Copyright fees are also paid for TV and radio and amount to some £10.000

Good response to bed appeal but some still needed

Desire Petroleum remains optimistic

SPEAKING to local shareholders in Desire Petroleum plc at a meeting in Stanley on Monday evening. Chairman Dr Colin Phipps said that he was more optimistic than he had been for a long time about the company's prospects of finding oil in commercial quantities in the North Falkland Basin.

High oil prices since the last Falklands drilling campaign in 1998 has led to a global concentration on production and an associated increased demand for oil platforms, which limited rig availability and pushed daily rates out of the reach of exploration companies like Desire.

Dr Phipps said that increased rig production in response to demand and a tendency for rig producers to tie oil companies to long contracts, which in some cases they could not fulfil, seemed to have led to an increase in rig availability in the last six months, with the expectation also that daily rates, currently as high as SUS 450,000, would fall significantly. While the wait to begin drilling has been frustrating for the company. Dr Phipps assured the thirty or so shareholders present that the time has not been wasted. Much additional geological and geophysical work has been done on the licensed areas, which has resulted in the identification of more drilling prospects and a significant de-risking of several of its existing prospects.

Interest in Desire's licences continues to be shown by potential partners, said Dr Phipps, but the Board does not discount the possibility of drilling independently if a rig should become available which is fundable from the company's own resources. In either case, Desire would go into a drilling campaign better prepared than ever before, he said.

Taxi driver fined after front road accident

A STANLEY taxi driver was fined for driving without due care and attention in court on Wednesday.

Derek George McDonald (32) pleaded guilty to driving a taxi transit van without due care on July 13.

Crown Counsel Julia Kraehling-Smith told the court that Mr McDonald was travelling along Ross Road near the West Store when he drove into a Land Rover belonging to Mr Ken Newton parked outside the shop.

Mr McDonald initially told the police that he was sneezing and did not pull out far enough to pass the vehicle, however in interview he said he was concerned that a group of youths hanging out by the public toilets might spill over onto the road. He said he was travelling at a speed of 25 - 30 miles per hour and did not slow down.

Ms Kraehling-Smith said Mr McDonald has nine previous convictions in the last ten years although none since 2003.

Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson said that as this was not a first offence there was a potential maximum fine of £3,000 and additionally the court could have considered disqualifying Mr McDonald from driving.

However, Mr McDonald, who is paying Mr Newton and the taxi owners for the damage to their vehicles, was fined £250 plus £70 costs and had his licence endorsed.

Bulldozing bothers Cape Pembroke visitors

REGULAR visitors to the Cape Pembroke peninsula have been expressing their shock and annoyance at new damage caused in the area.

What at first sight appears to be a partly constructed track has been made along the area commonly known as Penguin Walk.

One Penguin News reader felt the work had been done in a "hack and slash way" with "no apparent awareness of the fragile environment they are working in." Councillor for the environment,

Councillor for the environment, Dr Richard Davies, said the department responsible is the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF), who are tasked with looking after minefield fences.

The Officer Commanding FIDF, Major Peter Biggs, explained that the work had been carried out not to form a track but to help contain a minefield.

He explained that for some time it has become increasingly difficult to maintain the minefield fences in the areas affected by shifting sand dunes. The sand and quick growing grass drifts against the fences and in some areas covers the fences in quite a short space of time. The minefield fence maintenance contractor builds extensions to the fences to cover these gaps, he said, however as the horizontal line of the fence becomes increasingly distorted the stability, stock resistance and visibility of the fences deteriorates.

In an attempt to improve the qualify of the fence, a bulldozer, together with an experienced driver, were employed to clear, in so far as practicable, the outside of the fence. "This action will hopefully stop or decrease the sand accumulation and possibility reverse it in some areas." Major Biggs said. He added, "While the bulldozer

He added, "While the buildozer was on station it was decided to clear a couple of areas for a new fence line. The building of a new fence on a straighter line would result in a neater, more stock resistant fence and safety barrier.

"It was recognised that authorisation would be required to build a new fence along the revised perimeter, however to not take advantage of the plant and driver while it was on station would have been wasteful. I should point out that all the works were subject to safety scrutiny by the EOD."

During the process of clearing the fence some damage was caused to a couple of areas that were outside of the operation; this was unintentional, Major Biggs said, and is regretted. "The difficulty of using plant in such a confined area should not be underestimated, however, and generally the works were carried out with skill and economy

"I understand the need to look after the environment and that the peninsula is an exceptionally vulnerable area. This has to be balanced with the practicalities of maintaining minefield fences that are safe and have a reasonable standard of stock resistance.

"The works will make the maintenance programme more safe, from the point of view of the maintenance contractor getting materials to the fence, and will facilitate improvements. The tlat surface on the outside of the fence was a byproduct of the process of clearing the fence and is not intended as a track."

Cllr Davies said he became aware of the work once it had been completed and visited the area in question with Major Biggs and the Environmental Planning Officer. He said it was difficult to see how the fence in the area of the sand dunes could have been cleared in a less obtrusive way.

However, he added, in another area where the minefield fence runs through an area of diddle-dee and grass, the tops of hummocks have been bulldozed off to make a smoother surface.

"The layer of topsoil is very thin, and the underlying sand has been exposed, which may now erode. This did not seem to me to be strictly necessary to allow access to the fence. "Nevertheless 1 accept that the

"Nevertheless 1 accept that the contractor did the work in good faith, intending to improve access, and no harm was intended." He continued, "FIDF had con-

He continued, "FIDF had contracted a private individual to do the work. They explained that the opportunity to get the work done came up at short notice and so they had not informed the EPD.

"As a result of this incident, in the future we will clarify and publicise a procedure for government departments and private persons who intend to carry out works on the Common. Permission to carry out work might be obtained through the EPD or by consultation with Environmental Committee members; I have asked for the issue to be discussed at the next environmental committee meeting."

Cllr Davies added, "It may be primarily an issue for the Lands Committee but the environmental impact of work on the Common is often the main factor which needs to be considered.

"If a government department contracts a private individual there would need to be clear instructions, if not a formal contract, about the nature of the work to be done."

Q DOES the government still own all the beaches and six feet above the high water mark all around the Falklands as it used to do?

A Our thanks to Senior Crown Counsel, Alison Inglis, for her prompt response to this question.

The Crown, that is to say the Falkland Islands Government, owns all land in the Falkland Islands, except where it has already disposed of the freehold of the land by Crown Grant.

The Land Ordinance does not

automatically reserve to the Crown ownership of all the beaches and land six feet above the high water mark.

Whether, in any particular case, the Crown owns the beaches and coastal fringe (ie, the land immediately above the high tide mark) depends on the terms of the particular Crown Grant.

Where a Crown Grant describes land as bounded by the sea, this means the high water mark at spring tides. Where a Crown Grant describes land by reference to a plan, which shows the land as running up to the sea, again this means the high water mark at spring tides. In such cases the Crown owns the foreshore, that is to say the beach between the high and low tide marks.

There are very few Crown Grants in which the Crown has conveyed the foreshore to the landowner, but in most Crown Grants of land adjacent to the sea the landowner will own all land above the high tide mark, unless the Crown Grant specifically reserves to the Crown ownership of the coastal tringe.

Are government's spending priorities in the right order?

- Penguin News asks the public what they think... -

PEOPLE are unhappy with the way government funds are being spent.

In an opinion poll conducted in the West Store foyer, last week, 64% of respondents said the government did not have its spending priorities in the right order.

In a vox pop involving fifty members of the public, people were asked if the government had its spending priorities in the right order, where they would prefer to see investment targeted and what capital projects they felt was money well spent.

Tourism should receive more funding, was the opinion of 20%, as should medical services and care for the elderly.

The Sand Bay Wind Farm is the most popular capital project underway at the moment, with 20 people saying it was money well spent while, just down the road, the abattoir was less popular with several people suggesting its funding should be stopped. The new Stanley sewerage sys-

The new Stanley sewerage system was also a popular project and funds invested in Camp roads are considered worthwhile. Concerns however were expressed that the investment in Camp roads will be wasted if moves are not made to maintain them properly.

The new ferry service and proposed terminals stimulated much discussion with most people being more than happy to see it going ahead but expressing dismay at the level of funding for a project that seems unlikely to generate income for some time

"The proposed £3 million for the terminals would go a long way to improving infrastructure for the tourism industry and would be recouped much more quickly." said one tourism industry worker.

Some in Stanley may be surprised to learn that there is also concern in Camp at the cost of the terminals.

"Proper docking is needed more for tourism, fishing and supply ships - FIPASS has been hanging on by a shoestring for years and there is a risk of losing revenue because of the lack of facilities." said Doreen Dickson of Wreck Point. The wind farm is great, she said, "...we have to think in the long term of the environment and we've made a start."

"I fully support the concept of the ferry, but can't understand why it has to be so expensive," said Dae Peck who added that she would be interested to see a breakdown of the costs involved.

Raymond Evans from Pebble Island also thought it could be more cost effective and worried that there might be an unnecessary overspend; "It happens with a lot of projects." he said.

Raymond said he would support more investment in the Falkland Islands Government Air Service (FIGAS) adding that there is an urgent need for a new aircraft but even if it was to be ordered now it would

be unlikely to be in service before the next tourist season.

The wind farm and sewerage system are both worthwhile projects said Liz Dimmlich of Stanley, as is the ferry, "...but not to the levels they are proposing."

A lack of facilities and housing for young people was also high on the list of areas people wished to see funding directed at, while while the need for maintenance to roads both in Stanley and Camp was frequently mentioned.

Bill Pole-Evans takes time out on his Chilean holiday to check out ferry terminals

THE ferry terminals proposed for the cross Sound service are "ridiculously overpriced," Bill Pole-Evans from Manybranch Farm on West Falkland believes.

He can't see the need for breakwater shelters at Second Creek. "...as Port Howard harbour is sheltered anyway."

Bill has recently been to Chile and opted to do some research of his own on the subject. He took a trip on the ferry *Melinka* from Punta Arenas to Porvenir in Tierra del Feugo some 26 miles across open water.


"There are no breakwaters at their ramp and it is more open than Falkland Sound." Bill observed.

The Melinka is 43m long, is 43 years old and is an open bow ramp landing craft, it can carry 200 passengers.

On the return journey to Punta Arenas the wind increased to 45-50 knots so sea conditions were rough and the *Melinka* shipped a considerable amount of water into the car deck, said Bill.

The landing ramps used by the ferry is a simple concrete slope with a diagonal face to allow berthing from high to low tides.

"I consider the Second Creek site to be a waste of public money when the Port Howard site was more than half built after the jetty washed away and cost a fraction of the proposed amount for Second Creek." concluded Bill who is a keen seaman and stands to benefit from the investment in the ferry terminals.



HAVING heard the news about the extortionate price the ferry terminals are likely to cost (not taking into account the extra costs of the conversion work now needed on the *Concordia Bay*) how much more money is the government going to waste on yet another scheme that is going to forever need to be subsidised once it finally gets up and running.

We are all in favour of an East/ West ferry, having travelled over on the Tamar for a very pleasant week on the West earlier in the year, but, for a fraction of the cost the Tamar could have been adapted for use as a roll on/roll off ferry and continued to operate using Port San Carlos and Port Howard as the terminals. Has anyone done a survey to see just how many people actually use the existing service, albeit not as regular as one would wish? If we are to eventually get a weekly. or even twice weekly ferry it does not take a genius to work out that there is not the population here to ever make it viable without government heavily subsidising it.

Surely the £3,000,000 plus would be much better used in preparation for the new deep water port that is desperately needed and would actually bring money into the country. once finished, not only from the ever growing cruise ship industry but also from fishing and oil and gas exploration. Once the decision is finally made as to where the port is actually going to be sited the PWD road gangs could spend a lot of the better weather days during the autumn/winter months doing a lot of the ground work on the port. We know that the deep water port is going to cost a lot more than the ferry terminals but at least once finished it will straight away boost government income with an increase in tourists from cruise ships, whereas the ferry will only continue to cost government more money.

We wonder what would happen if we were to have a very bad tourist season weatherwise, which prevented a lot of the major ships from letting their passengers ashore. Last season there were a few days when tenders brought passengers ashore in very choppy sea conditions so the last thing we want is for there to be a tragic accident, where lives could be lost.

There are more and more people working in tourism related businesses both full time and part-time so a lot would really struggle financially if the tourist numbers were to suddenly decrease considerably. This does seems to be on the cards as a lot of the cruise lines are threatening to cut the Falklands out of their itineraries as we are the only place on their schedule where they do not have berthing facilities and have to get passengers to the shore by means of tender or zodiac transfers.

If this were to happen would government then consider giving assistance of some kind to businesses affected by the decline of tourists, as it would be their fault because they are dragging their heels on the matter, instead of making a decision and getting started on the new port? It is not going to happen overnight and will probably take a few years to complete so prompt action is really needed.

Focus investment in proven growth areas

THE loss of growth and a 10% reduction per annum in tourist numbers experienced by the Cayman is a drop in the ocean compared to the writing on the wall for the Falklands.

The large vessel operators have quite clearly stated that if in five years there is no significant improvement in berthing facilities (ie a deepwater pier) then the large vessels (and there are more of them and less smaller ones each year) will simply start to drop the Falklands off their itineraries. That will account for about 75% of current tourist numbers! There is nothing much here that they cannot see elsewhere in South America which has better port facilities - these are the simple bare facts.

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So unless FIG want to see a stop to any future increase in tourism and a very large drop in current numbers - they need to focus a bit more on investment in proven growth areas of the economy rather than pouring even more into "dead end" investment elsewhere.

Land based tourism has not got much more capacity for expansion - the Lan flights are already almost at saturation point from November to March, and if after two years of negotiations by FIG with MOD, all the results to date are some bigger seats for a few people there is little chance of increasing tourism access by that route.

Shipborne tourism is the one growth industry that we can work to expand - if the Falklands want to bother with growth industries like tourism and fishing. **Tim Miller**



Improve berthing facilities soon

YOUR reference to the Cayman Islands reduction in tourist visits by cruise ships is nothing compared to what is awaiting these Islands.

The operators of large cruise ships have clearly stated it is their intention to leave the Falklands off their itineraries unless there are big improvements, and soon, to the facilities for berthing.

Tourism is acknowledged to be the second biggest industry we have with very many of our population depending upon its continuing growth. It is not only the shops, restaurants, pubs and taxis who benefit significantly - you only have to look at the number of "independent drivers" offering their services and listed in the Tourist Board hand-outs on days of ship visits to see the growth. At the beginning of last season there were seven drivers, whilst in the following March this had increased to no less than seventeen.

This is not a subject that can be put on hold and left to simmer. Action needs to be taken now - if not a deep-water port then at the very least a deep-water pier by the extension of the Public Jetty. The alternative does not bear thinking about as so many businesses will go to the wall in such a short period of time unless we act now and not leave it to tomorrow. Graham France Stanley

Some of the conventions are related to environmental issues, such as the Kyoto Protocol, which requires countries to think about and reduce emissions that cause global warning, and the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea. which requires nations to sustainably manage fish stocks, particularly migratory species, and monitor the location of vessels carrying their flag, which is why Falkland Islands fishing boats carry Vessel Monitoring Systems

Environmentally, international agreements are important to the protection of marine mammals and birds that migrate between the land and sea of different countries. The Convention on the Conservation of Migratory Species of Wild Animals lists a number of priority species that countries should focus protection efforts on. In the Falklands, important migratory species include whales that visit the Islands en route between Antarctica and the tropics, and also albatross because they range across the oceans of the Southern Hemisphere

Albatross and petrels are among the most threatened birds in the world and for this reason, seven countries, including the United Kingdom and its South Atlantic Overseas Territories, signed up to a new multilateral agreement in 2004 called the Agreement for the Conservation of Albatross and Petrels, shortened to ACAP.

Environmental Officer at the Environmental Planning Depart-ment, Helen Otley, said ACAP seeks an "integrated and holistic approach" to albatross and petrel conservation throughout the Southern Hemisphere, "...and provides a focus for international cooperation and exchange of information and expertise

"ACAP concentrates efforts on understanding what processes and

activities threat albatrosses and petrels, both at sea and on land, as well as effective means of mitigating these threats

ACAP focuses on 29 species that are most at risk of extinction, she explained, and three of the species breed in the Falkland Islands; blackbrowed albatross, southern giant petrel and white-chinned petrel. We have only a handful of whitechinned petrels breeding here compared to South Georgia and other sub-Antarctic islands belonging to Australia, New Zealand and France

During the summer of 2005/06. Falklands Conservation's Scientific Officer Nie Huin made a census of black-browed albatross populations at twelve sites where they breed in the Islands. Nic estimated a breeding population of 382,000 pairs, which is about 65% of the world's population. On the same field trip, Tim Reid, Falkland Conservation's then Seabird Ecologist, made direct counts and took photos of the breeding colonies of southern giant petrels.

To Tim's surprise, there were 19,810 breeding pairs, which is a substantial proportion of the world's population. So it could be argued the survival of the blackbrowed albatross and southern giant petrel rests primarily with the people of the Falkland Islands.

Managing and protecting these seabirds, both on land and at sea, is an important and demanding task, Helen says, but not something that is new to the Falkland Islands. "ACAP landowners such as Roddy and Lily Napier. Ian and Maria Strange and David and Suzan Pole-Evans have been albatross ambassadors for many decades before ACAP came into force.



World Mental Health Day: Wednesday, October 10 How our behaviour affects others : Bullying

Mental Health Strategy Group THE World Federation for Mental Health (WFMH) is raising awareness of the impact of culture and diversity on mental health.

This means the role that culture plays in understanding people's per-ceptions of mental ill-health and how this influences people seeking and getting access to appropriate treatment.

Some obvious problems like language and communication barriers and the need for an interpreting service are easy to identify, while other problems like identifying discrimination and prejudice against others where it exists are more subtle, therefore harder to address.

The Falkland Islands, with approximately 3,000 residents originating from many different countries and speaking many different languages at home, other than English, would suggest that the impact of culture and diversity on health should have some relevance here in the Islands.

The Mental Health Strategy Group has chosen to raise aware-

ness of how we can discriminate against each other through our own behaviour, particularly bullying behaviour.

Whether the bullying results in blatant abuse of another or is the cause of emotional distress.

How to recognise bullying behaviour and what to do about it are very relevant issues here in the 1slands.

What is bullying?

 Aggressive Manner domineering, physically towering over others

· Manipulation - creating an '1 win. you lose' situation

· Verbal abuse - insults and shouting at people.

· Emotional abuse - put downs and excessive demands.

· Controlling - withholding information, resources, love or affection

 Cold Shoulder - ignoring someone. treating them like they don't exist.

These are just some of the tacties that people who bully adopt to control others and gain what they perceive to be the upper hand.

How to spot a bully

People who bully are generally not bullies all of the time

• At home - by partners, by children and other family members.

 At work = by colleagues, work mates or bosses. · At school - by class mates, or peer

groups or staff.

• At play – by friends who try to control what everyone else does, says and thinks.

· In the caring environment - by carers who may try to bully an elderly or disabled person

What are the effects of bullying?

Bullying behaviour can have a wide range of effects on victims including disturbed sleep, loss of appetite, poor concentration and becoming socially withdrawn

Long term effects of bullying can result in stress reactions, depression, PTSD and other forms of mental or physical ill health.

In extreme cases people have considered taking their own lives if they can see no way of escaping from the bully.

What can you do to stop bullying?

· Recognise bullying behaviour for what it is.

· Talk to someone you trust about the problem.

 Name the bully. · Keep a record of the bullying be-

haviour.

· Seek professional advice.

· If in the workplace, check what your policy says.

Don't suffer in silence.

· Break the silence. Don't allow the bullying behaviour to continue

· If you know a bully do not collude with their bullying behaviour.

Falklands can build a reputation for great crafts

DOZENS of people took the opportunity to hone their craft skills this month, under the watchful eye of visiting textile craftsman Andrew Johnson.

Workshops held in Stanley and Camp were well attended by spinners and weavers both new and experienced.

Andrew was in the Islands under the Shackleton Scholarship Fund, as a Quality of Life Scholar. He has decades of experience in all textile crafts, including weaving, spinning, dyeing, and lace making.

A Bachelor of Honours in textiles specialising in weaving and lace making. Andrew has lectured for many years and has produced under commission a number of ecclesiastical embroideries.

Andrew's visit to the Islands came about through a university contact of his wife - she went to school with Director of Fisheries for South Georgia, Harriet Hall; Harriet is a member of the Guild of Spinners and Weavers and suggested Andrew apply to be a Quality of Life scholar through the Shackleton Scholarship Fund.

He had previously met Islanders at Guild meetings in the UK and was keen to visit. He says he had been interested in the Falklands following a two year stint on another Atlantic island - St Helena as handicrafts advisor to the island 25 years ago.

There he worked with lace makers, taught a number of people to spin and looked into markets for sale. Sadly he had difficulty in finding a market for St Helenian lace, "...due to the fact no one had heard of St Helena and they were basically competing with the Chineseisland wage rates even then were beyond competing with China..."

Andrew, an ordained minister with the Church of Wales, is passionate about textiles, describing his craft work as, "my sanity."

It is also a part of his spirituality, as he explains: "A lot of the work I do is ecclesiastical embroidery work, and I count weaving as very much a part of my prayer life. Some people sit and say mantras, some people use rosary beads, I use a loom, or an embroidery frame or a spinning wheel.

"It's something that I can lose my mind in but open it in other ways to the greater spirituality of the world."

Andrew says his wife does not share his passion for textiles but he does consult her on colour: " I use my wife to help with colour because everybody's palette is different and it is very useful to have her around.

"She's an autumn colour person and I am more a winter person, with whites and blues... She can help me put colours together in a way that I can't do comfortably. By working together we can complement each other."

Rosemary reported that Pam Berntsen travelled the furthest and longest to attend the West workshops - from Albemarle, she did a total of, "seven hours driving, to travel a total distance in the day of 287 km or 178.33 miles. That's a bit further than Ann Robertson who had a total of about 40 minutes less travel time, from Port Stephens to here and back..."

In addition to his ministering, Andrew teaches crafts in a local school and he took time to hold classes in Stanley's schools.

He is pleased the UK's National Curriculum now includes textiles lessons: "There has been a period when it hasn't been very strong and people are suddenly realising there is a generation out there who can't sew a button on..."

Andrew was "very impressed" with the level of skills he found in the Islands but, by the very nature of the this being a small place, he felt the approach of Falklands craftspeople was, "a little insular." He explains, "They specialised in very particular areas of spinning and I hope that in this trip I have managed to give them ideas for a few new directions.

"It's not that the skill levels aren't there, it's that they are specialising in one area. It gave them a chance to play in a different area and I hope it may inspire people to try new things."

The Guild of Spinners and Weavers meet in a Portacabin in John and Alison Barton's back garden and were, therefore, grateful to have the use of Fortuna's Globe Offices for Andrew's visit.

This meant the Stanley workshops had a roomy venue and on Monday afternoon an Open House was able to be held, displaying the array of work produced during Andrew's visits.

Andrew was full of praise for the Guild: "There was such friendliness and it's brilliant to see so much craft work being done. The Guild has obviously been a very good interacting place for people coming here on contract, to find ways of mixing with locals. "They also then have a skill they can go home with..."

He said the Guild members are now in a good position to keep progressing and trying to find things that might sell. "The tourist industry here needs feeding with good quality crafts. It's certainly better to get a reputation for good work, rather than for 'pap', and there is some great work produced here."

Wool market report for week ending September 28, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices increased at the fine end of the micron spectrum but fell at the broader end in Australia last week. Prices slipped in South Africa but were variable in New Zealand.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, price increases were between 2 and 6 pence per kilogram clean for fleece wool lots finer than 23 micron while losses at the broader end were generally between 2 and 8 p/ kg clean.

kg clean. The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up approximately 1 p/kg clean at 399.6 p/kg clean compared to the previous weeks closing level of 398.7 pence per kilogram clean.

Buying interest was strong with a solid mix of Chinese, Asian and European activity.

Concern over the impact of continuing drought conditions on wool supply in Australia remains as a major factor in markets at the moment.

In Australia last week 89% of the 57,379 bales offered to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 6.088 bales of crossbred wool of which 85 % were sold. In New Zealand only 76% of the 17,774 bales available were sold while in South Africa 98% of the 8,514 bales put forward were purchased.

Next week approximately 60,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in South Africa, Australia and New Zealand.







Chile vows support for Argentine claim

CHILE has promised to actively promote Argentina's claim to the Falkland Islands, following talks between the South American countries' foreign secretaries.

Argentine minister Jorge Taiana and his Chilean counterpart reportedly reached the understanding at a meeting held this week to discuss an array of issues including the supply of Argentine gas to Chile.

According to *Ambito Financiero*, Chile has committed to leading the call for the UK to discuss sovereignty issues in the South Atlantic.

Council spokesperson Andrea Clausen was unsurprised by the reports in light of increased pressure on the Chilean government to secure steady and reliable energy supplies from Argentina. She commented, "We must not forget that the Argentine presidential elections are very close and it's normal practice for Argentine candidates to use the Falklands issue to curry favour among voters.

"Furthermore, President Bachelet is at an all time low in ratings, largely linked to energy issues."

Councillors do not intend to directly appeal to the Chilean foreign minister for support, however they are planning a new public relations strategy for South America, Cllr Clausen revealed: "This will allow us to target effectively within South America to get our message across."

She is unconcerned by the Chilean support for Argentina: "Regardless of what the Chilean government is saying in terms of encouraging the UK to start negotiations on sovereignty, the Falkland Islands enjoy a close relationship with Chile and there are a number of Chileans living in our community - the relationship is mutually beneficial."

Worship in our schools?

CHRISTIAN assemblies could return to Falklands schools following discussions at this week's Education Board.

Councillor Janet Robertson made the proposal after receiving a letter from a parent asking what the government's policy was on religious education.

Cllr Robertson said it was not sufficient to provide classes in comparative religion, as these would offer only an intellectual understanding of different faiths: "That's information, that's knowledge, that's an understanding of the world around you, but in terms of spiritual guidance what do we provide? We provide nothing. Even a course of comparative religion is not spiritual guidance it provides knowledge and understanding."

Natalie Smith agreed that religious assemblies should be reintroduced, and favoured a return to the previous practice of alternating between Anglican and Catholic assemblies.

Councillor Richard Stevens said he had no strong opinion on the matter, but playing "devils advocate", said: "It would perhaps be a Christian hymn and a Christian prayer. I don't know in today's society whether it would be appropriate for the schools rather than the families to lead.

"There are a number of different religions and different sects of the same religion and by bringing in a certain sect - even if it's the majority religion - it probably won't suit the majority. A number of parents might think if we are having a particular sect in, that it's well, less than indoctrination, but it is just coming in from one direction."

Although acknowledging that the Falklands have more than one religion, Cllr Robertson said: "We are overwhelmingly a Christian country and I think it's got to be taken into account. There are certainly lots of non-religious people, and I think that's why the Ordinance provides for people to remove their children if they feel strongly about it, but the system we have at the moment is to provide no spiritual guidance at all, which is not the right thing either."

Man guilty of sexual assault

A 24 YEAR-OLD man has been remanded in custody after admitting the sexual assault of a child.

In court on Tuesday Leroy John Young did not apply for bail after pleading guilty to assault of a child under the age of 13. He will spend the next six weeks in custody while a pre-sentence report is prepared. The Mount Pleasant worker

The Mount Pleasant worker was visiting Stanley with friends on the day of the assault. He picked up the twelve year-old girl in his vehicle and took her to his room at Lookout Lodge, where the assault took place.

Crown Counsel Julia Krachling-Smith said the girl was not entirely sure she should go with Mr Young to Lookout Lodge but nevertheless went with him and later regretted doing so: "She lacked the emotional maturity and street smart to handle a situation of this kind." She said the case came down to an adult male putting a twelve year-old child through a sexual experience.

When interviewed by the police about the assault, Mr Young gave a full and frank admission of what had happened, Ms Kraehling-Smith said, and immediately admitted the offence.

The case is scheduled to return to court on November 20.

Rape of a child

A second man based at Mount Pleasant, who cannot be named for legal reasons, was released on conditional bail after he appeared before the Senior Magistrate on Tuesday.

He is charged with the rape of a child under the age of 13.

FIGAS remains leader-less

A SECOND candidate has turned down the job of running the government's air service (FIGAS).

In July Penguin News reported that the preferred candidate from South Africa had been unable to take up the appointment of FIGAS General Manager.

The position was subsequently offered to a reserve candidate and the government announced this week that he too had turned the job down after a "somewhat prolonged" consideration of the offer.

The post is now being re-advertised, in the UK, Australia, New Zealand and Canada.

ANYONE with any remaining hopes for the construction of a new port in Stanley within the next couple of years will have felt those dreams drift away if they met with any of the oil company representatives last week.

Had this group of men expressed any concerns about operating out of FIPASS in the next exploration phase, the campaign for a new port would undoubtedly have received added impetus - however they said the opposite. At the public meeting held at the end of the visit (attended by a disappointing number of people) Tim Bushell of FOGL was clear: for the exploratory phase the current set up is fine - "It worked last time and I'm sure it will work again."

If, however, they find oil in exploitable quantities they will clearly need better harbour infrastructure, and some of the visiting men were heard to say the industry would simply build a new port themselves if need be. This suggestion somewhat lets the government off the hook, and perhaps rightly so.

If someone else is willing to fund such a development - which has had a projected price tag of up to £40 million - would it not be sensible of the government to sit back and let them get on with it when they're ready?

Better still, a multi-faceted approach - with investment not only from oil operators but from the tourism, fishing and government sectors - could be the answer to everyone's needs.

But that is years off and while it may solve the funding issue of a new port, it doesn't negate the need to improve the condition of the landing stage used by so many visitors at the public jetty - a fundamental concern to tourist operators. We can't wait years for that work to happen.

A COUPLE of readers have suggested that the coverage of the vox pop carried out last week was 'Camp-slanted', something which was certainly not intentional, and this led to some interesting discussion on just who is willing to speak freely in the Falklands.

The poll was carried out by Sharon Jaffray in the West Store and Camp respondents were picked randomly from the electoral roll - everyone was asked the same questions and invited to comment further if they wished. We found, as we have with almost every vox pop we've carried out in the past, that Camp respondents (including those who wandered into the West Store and were confronted by Sharon, clipboard in hand) were much more forthcoming with opinion, and more willing to be quoted than their Stanley counterparts.

More often than not. Stanley respondents opted for simple "Yes/ no" answers, with a look of annoyance flitting across their faces when asked for comment. Should we assume from this that the majority of people in town just do not care about issues such as public spending?

One caller suggested this week that the revised tax regime means more people than ever fall below the tax bracket and therefore don't feel they are entitled to rock the boat. Another felt the fact that so many Stanley residents are civil servants prevents them from feeling they can speak freely.

Is anyone willing to shed light on this? Are you reluctant to question or criticise the establishment for these reasons? Are you put off for fear of being labelled "anti-Camp"? Or are you just not interested in what the government is up to? Please share your thoughts with *Penguin News.*

Optimism among oil operators

"THERE is good potential to find significant volumes of oil and gas in the Falkland Islands." That's the optimistic message from oil industry representatives who were in the Islands last week for a series of meetings with the government, private sector and military.

The men from Borders and Southern Petroleum, Rockhopper Petroleum, Desire Petroleum, Argos Resources and Falkland Oil and Gas Ltd (FOGL) hosted a public meeting in the Court and Council Chamber.

Speaking on behalf of the group, Tim Bushell of FOGL, the company which announced an important farm-out agreement with resources giant BHP Billiton last week, said the Islands were not far from large "well proven" oil basins in South America and, therefore, their hopes of oil or gas finds are high. BHP has committed to drilling at least two wells for FOGL in the next three years.

He spoke of the drilling round held in the late 1990s by some of the big name companies in the industry and said the companies now involved in exploration in the Islands were a new breed who work together. "It's becoming a common theme where small companies band together to form a consortium to charter a rig for a period. If you can share between operators it brings down the cost considerably." Each exploratory well requires around £15m in investment, Mr Bushell said, excluding the cost of mobilising the rig.

Looking ahead, he outlined what the future may hold if oil or gas is discovered in commercial quantities. If oil is found, he said, floating production technology would most likely be used. "It is standard technology that would work in a remote environment like this and, in terms of impact to the Falklands, you would see people coming and going but you wouldn't see any onshore plant."

The quickest this could be done after initially finding oil would be at least three years, he said: "So if we're drilling next year, realistically you're not going to see oil production until 2013/14."

If gas is found, the timescale could be much longer and whether or not it is even exploited depends on how much is found. Mr Bushell explained: "If we find a lot - and we have to talk about trillions of cubic metres - then there is an option which involves bringing the gas onshore and having a plant to liquify it then put it into ships to take up to the markets."

He showed the meeting a picture of the Snohvit development in Norway, an environment similar to the Falklands, and commented. "That is what would be required if we have an LNG plant in the Falklands.

"The time scale for this is much longer - it requires a lot more investment to build and you're probably talking ten years away, minimum, before you'd see something like this in the Falklands, even if we found gas next year."

John Perry of environmental consultants RPC also briefly addressed the meeting on his company's role in carrying out Environmental Impact Assessments (EIA) and monitoring once drilling begins. The EIA is a recognised formal process for assessing the likely impact of operations on the environment, and doing as much as possible to mitigate and minimise those impacts. "Our job is to check that the drilling companies do what they have said they will do," he explained.

Looking back on the week of meetings with the oil operators, Director of Mineral Resources Phyl Rendell said the Islands were now at an encouraging and challenging time with oil exploration.

She commented: "As Tim Bushell said, we are now assured that there will be wells drilled within the next three years due to the willingness of BHP Billiton to invest here.

"The oil operators at their joint meetings last week did not flag up any major concerns about managing a second drilling campaign from the Falkland Islands as facilities proved to be adequate in 1998 and many of those facilities have improved since then." Penguin News, October 12, 2007

Dave's Quest finds a safe berth Loans on offer for

THE newest addition to the Falklands fleet has finally reached Stanley after a long and eventful voyage

14 metre catamaran, Seaquest. has been brought to the Islands by Dave Eynon after two years of planning and building.

Constructed in Canvey Island, Essex, by Blyth Workcats, Seaguest can accommodate 12 passengers and two crew, and has space for three berths in either hull.

As well as taking cruise ship passengers on day trips close to Stanley, Dave hopes the vessel will have a wide range of other uses: "It's intended to be multipurpose. For my commercial diving work it's a really good work platform -I'll be able to put more equipment on and probably dive more safely. We'd also like to do a bit of research and exploration with it as well. We do a lot of diving with the wreck survey group and this will enable me to go out further and to dive on sites we've never dived before - you name it, we'll go there.

A number of trips have already been sold for this cruise ship season: "We're planning to go to Kidney Island - not going ashore, but to circumnavigate and really enjoy the wildlife there and then come away, just for them to have an hour there and see what we've got to offer. I'd like to do two tours a day, which will give them plenty of time to see the wildlife and then to come ashore.

Facilities include a galley, three toilets, and a flybridge on top of the boat to give improved views when wildlife-spotting.

The enterprise almost ended in tragedy, however, when the ves-sel was first lifted from the water at Marchwood for shipping in August. Dave said he feared for his life when the boat was dropped with him on board: "The front sling wasn't connected to the bow and it slipped forward and I fell off and under the jetty. I could quite easily have been squashed or speared by the VHF aerial. I went under the jetty and then had to crawl out."

The starboard bow and railings bore the brunt of the damage, racking up a £20K bill. Repairs were covered by insurance and were carried out in time for the boat to make the next sailing of the Ministry of Defence vessel.

Seaguest cost over a quarter of a million pounds, and was purchased by Southern Harvest, the joint venture company set up by Pesqueras de Bon and Dave's own

South Atlantic Marine Services. Dave said: "We've always said we would invest some of the prof-its that we make back into the Falklands and this is how we're doing it - it's a facility for tourists and it's money back into the economy. After the Boathouse and the jetty it's the biggest investment we've made.'

Locals will be able to charter the vessel, either for short trips such as whale watching in Falkland Sound, or for longer journeys such as a circumnavigation of East Falkland.

Dave is also happy to show her off to anyone who is interested in having a closer look: "If people want to have a look I don't mind, they can give me a call and arrange to come and look round - I'd be just as nosy.

FLH wool cash 'on the way'

ALMOST 200 bales of Falklands Landholdings (FLH) skirtings remain to be sold, which is later than usual but not uncommon, according to General Manager Owen Summers.

Three hundred and eighty-five bales were sold during September and payment for them is not yet due. One lot (26 bales) was sold earlier and payment for this is imminent.

Mr Summers said that while payment is late this year, final payments in October and November have not been uncommon in the past from some companies

Citing an earlier, more difficult year, he said: "FLH was owed a considerable amount by DB Holdsworths two years ago and final payments from that were in January

Cllr Stevens, however, warned against stigmatising children by removing them from assemblies. The only other member of the Board attending

esterday's meeting, Director of Education Barbara Booth, raised two practical issues – whether staff would have the right not to attend, and who would supervise children who were removed by their parents.

No one on the Board knew whether assemblies had been dropped as the result of a policy decision, or whether the practice had simply lapsed over time. It was agreed that they would consult with colleagues on Legislative Council and within the Department of Education before further discussion.

'private' roads

PROPOSALS to offer loans for private road building were given cautious support by the Falkland Islands Development Board on Tuesday.

A discussion paper written by General Manager Mark Brunet suggested that FIDC could provide loans for up to 50 per cent of the cost of building new roads in Camp where there is a commercial benefit.

The loans would be offered to meet needs not served by the current road building programme, such as wildlife sites and remote tourist accommodation. Funding would come from FIDC's existing loan pool, which stands at around £100K. Roads to domestic properties would not be eligible.

There was less enthusiasm for the proposal that roads which minimise damage to environmentally sensitive areas should receive 50 per cent grant funding.

Board member Ron Binnie commented: "When we look at the environmental areas that require a road, they are commercial businesses that would cause the damage and would be receiving a lot of income from the damage they were causing, so I don't see that they should get a grant to stop that."

Mr Brunet agreed that it was a difficult balance to strike: "It's difficult to encourage entrepreneurship and the creation of profit, and to encourage people to do so in a way that's environmentally responsible. What the role of FIG is in that is understandably something that politicians will wish to take a view on eventually.

The government's Chief Executive Dr Michael Blanch warned members to be cautious about getting involved in what could become a significant programme of work, particularly if offering grants: With the money that you have got you could perhaps do about 10km. I just ask whether it's wise to move into building roads for environmental purposes - 1 wonder if you are perhaps getting into bed with an extension policy here where you might find it difficult to meet demand in due course."

However, Mr Brunet said he was not necessarily recommending that FIDC itself provide grants.

Views on the paper are being gathered from the Tourist Board, Chamber of Commerce and Rural Business Association.

It will also be presented to the government's Environment Committee before returning to the Transport Advisory Committee for a decision on the proposals.

Escape case adjourned

Wayne McCormick appeared in court on Wednesday charged with assisting a lawfully detained person to escape from custody.

The case was adjourned to October 24.

Listeners' concern at radio court coverage

THE manager of the Falklands' radio station has responded to criticism of the way it reported the cases of two men who appeared in court charged with sexual offences against children earlier this week.

Complaints were received about various aspects of the news item, which was originally included on News Direct on Tuesday.

Station Manager, Corina Bishop, said some concerns centred on the style of reporting and the amount of detail carried in the report. She commented: "I would like to explain that we were trying to find a very fine balance in the interests of accuracy. We had previously faced criticism in September 2005 when we reported another case of a sexual offence against a child.

"On that occasion because we didn't explain the nature of the charge some people had assumed that the offence was of a different nature (and even more serious) than it actually was. In the case this week we were attempting to avoid such confusion happening again." this week, Corina says she has reviewed the station's reporting procedures for sensitive cases of this nature and from now on, wherever possible, all reports will be subject to additional checks before publication.

Another concern voiced to her was that this may discourage other people who have suffered abuse from coming forward and reporting what has happened to them. Corina responded: "These are not easy cases to report on, and in a small society they will always have a far greater effect on the public in general than would be the case elsewhere.

"We can only hope that the detail of reporting does not affect the willingness of any present or future victims to come forward, but hope instead that it will serve to prove that the perpetrators of such crimes will be dealt with by the system, which is the fundamental role of the media in court reporting – ensuring that justice is seen to be done."

Corina said the station staff wished to apologise for any further anguish caused to the complainants or their families.

Game hire man lied to customers

A MOUNT PLEASANT man has been fined £4,250 for a year-long scam involving fruit machines.

Colin Leslie Robert Smith pleaded guilty to seven charges of theft involving a total of £2167.15. Two further charges were dropped.

The court heard that Mr Smith was the sole Falklands representative of a company called Games Tech, which hires out fruit machines at MPA and in Stanley.

The company had a policy of removing machines from service after a certain period of time, regardless of whether they still functioned. Mr Smith was ordered to take three working machines out of service and told that they would not be replaced by the company.

Instead, he left two of the machines in place so that he could collect the money himself, and did not inform the premises hosting the machines. He then hired the third to the Upland Goose Hotel in Stanley, claiming that it belonged to Games Tech, even though he intended to collect the money himself.

Crown prosecutor, Julia Kraehling-Smith, told the court that it was not known if Mr Smith had removed money from the machines before the scam was discovered, so the charges were based on the amount left in the machines when they were recovered.

Keith Watson, in mitigation, told the court that the money left in the machines had been recovered by Games Tech, and so was not actually lost by them. He also pointed out that, as the company had not intended to replace the machines, they had not lost any income through Mr Smith's activities.

He said: "It was not a breach of trust by cooking the books, it was a breach of trust by not doing as he was told and deriving a profit from that breach of conformity."

Harrier offer too high for Falklands bidders

A HARRIER jet which was being bid for in the hope it could be 'retired' on display at Stanley airport fetched a higher price than local campaigners had hoped, leaving them out of the running.

The 1982 veteran aircraft was bought for £33,000 - those behind the Falklands bid had hoped to secure it for around £20,000.

All is not lost, however. One

of the people behind the campaign, Andy Brownlee, believes six Harriers that were involved in the conflict are still in existence.

He commented, "Fingers crossed we can source one of these - normally they go for around £20,000. Failing that I personally would also like to explore the possibility of getting a Vulcan bomber as a second choice."

Cllr: '£3m will aid business growth'

A COUNCILLOR has defended the allocation of £3 million for the construction of the East and West Falkland ferry terminals as a way of allowing business to flourish in Camp.

While admitting the £3m is "a hell of a lot of money" Councillor Andrea Clausen added: "We arc providing the communication infrastructure to allow a business community to grow and develop in the rural parts of the Falklands."

In this coming summer season, the East Falkland terminal at Newhaven and the temporary terminal at Port Howard on the West will be built. The cost of this temporary construction was included in the £1.89 million estimate for the Second Creek terminal. The work at Port Howard will allow breathing space and time to consider how Second Creek will develop, possibly at a lower price than forecast, ClIr Clausen said.

In opting to build the West terminal at Second Creek, Executive Council (ExCo) went against a recommendation by the Transport Advisory Committee (TAC), who wanted it built at Port Howard.

Cllr Clausen argues that the TAC had no figures to work from when making their recommendation, however this was not why the TAC was overruled. She explained: "They were using in their consideration the fact that they wanted a back up deep water port on West Falkland in the eventuality that SAAS may not be able to get into Fox Bay for some reason. ExCo considered that the discussion we should be having was about the bridge itself - ie the ferry. We have a deep water port in Stanley so why would we bother to build a bridge between East and West Falkland and put a second deep water port on West Falkland?"

She continued, "What they didn't take into account that ExCo did was future proofing - when this thing works and we start to see development taking place in and around the terminals, having a terminal in the middle of a working farm is not practical, whereas there is stacks of land, subject to negotiation and agreement with the farm owners, for development and expansion at Second Creek."

Business sector canvassed for town plan ideas

THE review of Stanley's town plan continued this week with a meeting at the Chamber of Commerce.

Stanley business representatives met with the Environmental Planning Officer, Andrea Wright, to discuss the review and identify areas they felt needed re-examining.

A number of criticisms were made about building on green spaces in Stanley, something Ms Wright said had only been allowed to happen on one site in East Stanley.

Robert Rowlands of Stanley Services Ltd was keen to see development - particularly in the retail and business sectors - take place on the south side of the By-Pass Road, east of the Trough. He said it was the logical place for such development and could include plenty of space for parking.

Ms Wright said the Chamber's views will be considered alongside the other representations she has received on the public consultation exercise, to which she said she had received a "reasonable" response.

Once the consultative round is complete, she will report back to the Planning and Building Committee and then to Executive Council.

Following that, work will take place on a preliminary draft Stanley Town Plan Review, including regular reporting to the Planning and Building Committee and ExCo on various issues. A further two month period of public consultation will be then held on the draft town plan review before it is approved.

Police recording calls in and out of station

WE'VE all seen television coverage of court cases in which recordings of telephone calls to police stations are played during trials. Many people may not realise, however, that this type of recording happens at Stanley's police station.

A new telephone system was installed at the station last year which allows all calls received and made by the police to be recorded.

There is no indication to callers that their call is being recorded and the recordings are the property of the Royal Falkland Islands Police.

There is no specific law in relation to recording telephone calls to and from the police station, however Inspector Len McGill insisted that care is taken with the system: "The system is managed and only accessible by one named sergeant. Calls are only ever referred to if there is a genuine need and this is authorised by a senior officer.

"Examples of such situations may be a distressed caller who has hung up before the officer taking the call has gained the information they needed; a complaint by a member of the public that they were verbally abused or insulted by an officer when receiving a telephone call from the police station; someone who disputes what was said; or as part of an investigation when the information contained in the call is material in that investigation."

Wool grabber and corer on the way

FARMERS are to have an easier. safer way to core their wool in Stanley

The Falkland Islands Development Board on Tuesday approved the purchase of mechanical coring and grabbing equipment to be situ-ated on FIPASS. The machinery will be operated by farmers under the supervision of staff from the Department of Agriculture.

Coring is currently carried out manually on FIPASS, and FIDC General Manager, Mark Brunet, told the board that providing the equipment would address health and safety issues as well as com-mercial development: "Some of the farmers invited me down to FIPASS to participate in manual coring and I wholeheartedly recommend this proposal to the board.

"It's difficult, hard work, like lots of farming - but it's also an activity which is proven to cause injury to farmers. I think this is a really good example of a project that has a benefit that goes much more widely than just making life easier for people

If the initiative is successful, a second machine could be purchased for Fox Bay for use by farmers exporting wool direct from West Falkland.

Coring and grabbing give farmers the opportunity to test their wool and provide accurate information to buyers on its quality. The Board heard that carrying out the work in the Falkland Islands meant that test results could be prepared while the wool was shipped to markets, and sped up the sale process

Board members acknowledged that the purchase would not be popular with wool agents, who currently offer coring services to farmers. However, they felt that the move would put power di-rectly into the hands of farmers.

The reconditioned machinery is being purchased from the Wool Testing Bureau in Port Elizabeth. South Africa, at a cost of £31K including shipping and commissioning

Mr Brunet said the need to purchase reliable equipment had been balanced with affordability: "I would suggest that we have learned some lessons from the purchase of the double dump machine. The machine that's been identified seems to provide the best possible value for money.

Cruise ship aground and missing Falklands tour mountaineers - a deep south exercise for vet's band?

AS THE grounding of the cruise ship Nordkapp in Antarctica last year showed, the increased amount of tourist traffic to more isolated parts of the world means there is also an increased risk of danger.

King Edward Point, South Georgia, was the setting for a three day cruise ship disaster exercise involving military units, members of the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF), staff from the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) and South Georgia government and the island's patrol vessel Pharos SG.

The exercise was based around a typical South Atlantic cruise ship carrying approximately 180 passengers and crew, which had landed a party of mountaineers to cross the Thatcher Peninsular.

The vessel had then headed towards Grytviken to allow her tourists ashore to see the wildlife and to recover the mountaineering team. While approaching Grytviken in deteriorating weather the cruise ship suffered a total engine failure and was blown aground opposite King Edward Point. Some passengers abandoned ship, mostly by swimming and waded the short distance onto the rocky shore line.

With assistance from people working ashore, they made their way along the coast to Grytviken. where a shuttle service was established to take the passengers across to the base at King Edward Point. With local resources and personnel overwhelmed, a call for

assistance was put out by the South Georgia government. The call was answered by HMS Southampton, on routine patrol in the area, accompanied by RFA Gold Rover.

By the time the ships arrived, the mountaineering party from the cruise ship was overdue and there was a small amount of fuel spillage around the grounded vessel; most of the passengers and crew were stuck aboard the darkened cruise ship due to bad weather.

As the remaining passengers were recovered and cared for, members of the FIDF, joined by the Roulement Infantry Company, set off to find the lost mountaineers. At the same time, the crew of HMS Southampton conducted maritime pollution drills to contain the fuel escaping from the stricken vessel.

Commander of British Forces South Atlantic Islands, Brigadier Nick Davies, who was on HMS Southampton for the exercise said: "A great deal of cooperation between the military, government and other organisations was critical to ensuring the success of all activities undertaken.

We routinely work with government and other agencies operating in the region on Search and Rescue tasks, and this timely exercise in advance of the summer season has allowed us to refresh contingency plans and demonstrate the value of maintaining these close links.

Hugh is also keen for the band members - who have individual experience in a wide range of musical disciplines including choral music - to hold workshops at the schools and to perform for a fundraising dance.

THE Falklands Wool Company will submit a comparison of its first year sale prices against its original business plan to the next meeting of ExCo.

Mark Brunet, who sits on the board in his capacity as General Manager of the Falkland Islands Development Corporation, told FIDB on Tuesday: "I detected a positive approach from the board of the wool company towards next year, one where there is a distinct and clear vision for what WoolCo can do in the future which is realistic."



Port report is ready - at last

A LONG-AWAITED report on port development options for the Falklands will be sent to members of the Falkland Islands Development Board in the coming weeks.

General Manager of FIDC, Mark Brunet, told members at a board meeting on Tuesday that he now had a final version of the report and would issue it to them shortly. The report was originally submitted by Royal Haskoning in July and has since been under discussion by FIDC staff and the consultants, who visited the Islands in April.

Members of the Board heard that elements of the report had been "sanitised" as part of this process. Councillor Richard Davies asked whether board members would be allowed to see the unsanitised version. On being told that only one minor change had been made to sanitise the report. Chamber of Commerce representative. Mike Forrest observed: "If that's the only item, it's taken a considerable time sanitising it."

After being circulated to FIDB members. it will be submitted to Executive Council and in due course made public. CHILDREN from a Stanley school have won a Veterans Day newspaper competition - but they're from Stanley in Blackpool, not the Falklands.

Six students from Stanley Primary School in Blackpool headed to the Ministry of Defence's head office in London to receive a certificate and a cheque for £2,000 from Veterans Minister Derek Twigg on Wednesday, October 3.

The competition tied in with the UK commemorations of the Falklands Conflict.

Primary school children between the ages of 9 and 11 were asked to design and produce the front page of a newspaper that covered events on a day or week during the period 2 April to 20 June 1982.

Westers troubled by costs of terminals

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Bird numbers rise as rats drop

WORK to eradicate rats from sensitive tussac islands by a number of organisations has directly led to an increase in bird numbers.

Falklands Conservation say there is still plenty of work to do as they continue their eradication programme with the baiting of Inner North-West Island in Falkland Sound, off Port Sussex.

Inner North-West is a tussac island recovering from grazing and was also burnt approximately 15 years ago. It now has a thick tussac fringe, especially at the western end of the island, with a more open middle section sparsely covered by bogs - habitat that is ideal for rat-affected birds such as the tussac bird and the vulnerable Cobb's Wren.

Despite feeling a little worse for wear after the Conservation Ball, Nie Huin, Brian Summers, Ken Passfield and Isaac Forster loaded up Ken's yacht, *Porvenir* on Saturday, September 29, with 325kg of rat bait and a raft of food and other supplies.

Ken and Isaac then sailed *Porvenir* around to the islands via the southerly route, stopping in at George Island to escape a gale and experience the hospitality of Chris and Linsday May.

The following day *Porvenir* had a smooth journey up Falkland Sound, arriving at the island where Ken and Isaac unloaded the bait and supplies onto the island. Brian

and Nic were collected at Port Sussex the next morning and the team began baiting in the afternoon.

Isaac reported that the eradication lasted for around a day and a half, hand spreading 250kg of bait on the main island and off on an unnamed islet 300m away to the south-east. Outer North-West Island was also checked to see if the eradication conducted there three years ago was successful.

A vastly increased number of songbirds was found such as blackchinned siskins, grass wrens, and the Falkland thrush indicating a successful eradication, although further checks are needed to ensure the rat-free status of the island.

"A pair of tussac birds was also observed on Inner North-West Island, which is excellent news for their recolonisation after rat removal," Isaac said. "The completion of this island now takes the total cleared over the last six years to 19, a restored habitat area of 517 hectares."

The team returned to Port Sussex on October 4 and parted company with Ken and *Porvenir*.

Ísaac was full of praise for Ken: "The contribution of time by Ken and his yacht made the logistics for the project significantly easier, and provided a lovely comfortable home for the team. We are most grateful for his enthusiasm and support."

Wales unveils impressive new memorial to 1982 war





A NEW memorial to Welsh servicemen who died in the Falklands Conflict has been officially dedicated in Cardiff.

The event, witnessed by 1,400 veterans, families and guests, was a culmination of many years of hard work and dedication from the team at the Welsh branch of the South Atlantic Medal Association (SAMA82).

The drumhead service - in which the standards of SAMA82 and the HMS *Glamorgan* Falklands Association were laid across drums stacked by members of the band of the Royal Marines - was described by Welsh Guards veteran Kenny Dawkins as very moving. After the two minute silence a fly past was made by two Harrier jets, one from the Royal Navy, the other the Royal Air Force. Almost 300 Falklands veterans

Kenny reported: "We had veterans from the Royal Navy, Merchant Navy, Royal Air Force, Army, NAAFI, and many more. I am sure that every unit, ship, department and branch was represented on the parade."

The salute was taken by the Lord Lieutenant in front of Cardiff's City Hall. "The street was lined by well wishers who clapped and cheered - you could see the veterans grow a few inches taller, and there weren't many dry eyes amongst them." Kenny added.

Cardiff City Council then hosted a reception in the City Hall which was enjoyed by all.

Kenny described the events as "a cracking weekend." but added: "The real reason for being there was never far from our minds - the 258 comrades and friends, and Islanders that could not be with us. We will remember them."



MEMBERS of the military community in the Falklands held their own personal remembrance service for the late Major General Sir Jeremy Moore, Commander of British Land Forces during the Falklands War, who was laid to rest last week.

In a mark of respect, flags on all government buildings and at the Mount Pleasant base were flown at half mast on the day of Sir Jeremy's funeral.

In addition, a special flag lowering ceremony was held at the military cemetery at Blue Beach, San Carlos, the scene of recent services commemorating the 25th anniversary of the conflict.

Planning and building news

LAST month's Planning and Building Committee meeting began with the Chair (Hon Richard Davies) thanking Gerald Cheek for his three years of service as a lay member, and the writer for his past two months acting as the Building Advisor.

With the Hon Michael Summers standing in for the Hon Mike Rendell, the only other member of the committee present (in addition to Gerald Cheek) was Anna King.

Following the usual preliminaries, members were given an update by the Environmental Planning Officer (EPO). Andrea Wright, on two appeal decisions that had been allowed by Executive Council: outline permission for a dwelling on land at Moody Brook Road west of the Beaver Hangar, and the use of a room at 31 Ross Road West as a temporary retail outlet. In both cases a number of conditions were imposed on the advice of the EPO.

Two applications deferred at the last meeting were then discussed and, in the case of the mobile storage unit at 13 Ian Campbell Drive for Ken and Jacki Morrison, it was decided to grant planning permission subject to the provision of a dual-pitched roof within the next twelve months.

The proposed dwelling on land east of 25 Ross Road East for Gavin Thomas and Sharon Henry was again deferred as the possibility of additional land being purchased had not been furthered due to the absence of the owner from the Islands.

There were just six new applications for planning permission to be considered and the following were granted conditionally: the change of use of the existing garage to a workshop for a gun repair business at 33 Callaghan Road for Nevin Middleton; outline consent for a bungalow and garage on land to the rear of 7 Fitzroy Road for Marvin and Trudi Clarke; the temporary siting of a container for Saddle Computers on their land at Lookout Industrial Estate; and the erection of four dwellings with vehicle access on land at Mink Park on Moody Brook Road.

In the case of the proposal submitted retrospectively by the Public Works Department to crect a timber shed on land north of the Town Hall car park to protect a glass imploder from weather, it was decided that while planning permission could be granted, it was in fact "permitted development".

A second application by that department (the proposed installation of three 20-feet containers opposite the Fire Station) and which was the subject to an objection by the Tabernacle was deferred to allow further consideration of other options available for such siting.

Just one application for a building permit was reported upon (the new administration block at the Sand Bay abattoir), following which part one of the meeting closed with the date of the next being set for November 1 at 8.30am in the Liberation Room of the Secretariat.

Busy cruise season for South Georgia

THE forthcoming cruise ship season will be South Georgia's busiest ever, with over 60 visits bringing around 8,000 passengers to the island. The season begins on October 25 with the arrival of *Nordnorge*, bearing 300 passengers.

The South Georgia Government reports that it has issued licenses for 60 cruise ships so far, with another seven expected to apply – more than 50 per cent up on last season. The island's busiest period will be around Christmas and into January. Six ships will arrive between Christmas Eve and Boxing Day, with approximately 17 cruise ships visiting in January.

The largest visitor of the season will be the 720-passenger *Prinsendam* in early February. Another large ship, the 550 passenger capacity ship *Discovery*, will make three calls to Grytviken during the season. **MP**

Wool market report for week ending October 5, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

IN A similar pattern to the previous week, greasy wool prices increased at the fine end of the micron spectrum but fell at the broader end in Australia last week.

Prices increased in South Africa and New Zealand for finer wools as well.

As shown in the micron price guide below, price increases were between 1 and 17 pence per kilogram clean for fleece wool lots finer than 22 micron while falls were between 1 and 6 p/kg clean for broader fleece wool lots.

The AWEX Eastern Market Indicator (EMI) finished the week up approximately 5 p/kg clean at 404.4 p/kg clean compared to the previous weeks closing level of 399.6 pence per kilogram clean.

Buying interest was strong and from a broad mix of interests.

In Australia last week 92% of the 39,848 bales offered to the trade changed hands.

Included in the offering were 5,444 bales of crossbred wool of which 88 % were sold.

In New Zealand 80% of the 6,799 bales available were sold while in South Africa very strong demand was noted with buyers reporting an inadequate supply of wool available to satisfy their re-

quirements. Next week approximately 70.000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in South Africa, Australia and New Zealand.

Nigeria vs Glasgow for 2014 games

2014 MIGHT seem a long time away but inspections of the cities bidding to host the Games that year have already been taking place.

Last month Vice Chair of the Falklands Islands Overseas Games Association (FIOGA), Steve Dent, made whistle-stop trip to Abuja in Nigeria, the city competing with Glasgow to host the 2014 games. FIOGA Chair Patrick Watts represented the Islands at the inspection of Glasgow in August. The two men will report back to FIOGA and in October a vote will be taken on the association's preferred option.

Steve said Abuja was the underdog in the bid for the 2014 Games. "Glasgow has a strong big. It is a home country for us, easy to get to and their facilities are almost in place already. I went to Nigeria thinking theirs might be an empty bid."

However he now admits he was wrong. "Admittedly Nigeria has a terrible safety reputation at the moment, which is well founded in part, but not in Abuja. I felt as safe there as I would in central London or Santiago."

The facilities were not up to what most of the nations might have expected and Steve says, from a Falklands view, the shooting set up is a concern. "There is nothing at the moment, and there were no provisions for a rille range. That has been revised now. We encouraged them to look at what Delhi has planned for the 2010 Games."

The Falklands' main events are shooting, swimming and badminton and none of these events are strong in Nigeria, which Steve believes is why the facilities are not yet up to scratch. The climate will also offer a challenge along with the health risk. Athletes would be required to have a host of injections and take malaria tablets. Steve asks. "Do we want to subject our athletes to that?"

However, he says, an important part of attending the Commonwealth Games is having the opportunity to experience another culture and for this Abuja gets his vote. How the FIOGA vote will go however, is anyone's guess at the moment.

Every country has the same number of votes which means the Falklands, with its population of just under 3.000 has as much say in where the Games will be held as India does, with a population nearing one billion.

Many may think Glasgow's bid is a sure winner, however, if Abuja were to win, it would be the first time an African nation had hosted the Commonwealth Games and 2014 is Nigeria's 100th anniversary.

HMS *Fearless* bound for recycling

THE Falklands war veteran vessel, HMS *Fearless*, is to be recycled in Belgium, the Ministry of Defence has announced.

The former Royal Navy amphibious assault ship has been moored in Portsmouth Harbour since 2002, when she was replaced in the fleet by HMS *Bulwark*.

The ship will be recycled by Ghent-based company, Van Heyghen Recycling.

Minister for Defence Equipment and Support, Lord Drayson said the move demonstrated the MoD's commitment to reprocessing military equipment in an environmentally friendly way.

Along with her sister ship, *Intrepid*, the 12,000-tonne vessel played a key role in the 1982 conflict, when their flight decks supported helicopters and Harrier jets.

Fearless was launched in 1963, and was designed to support Royal Marine Commandos on amphibious operations by transporting and landing troops and equipment.

She also had a starring role as the ship which picked up James Bond in the 1977 film The Spy Who Loved Me.



Death of 1982 Land Deputy


THE man who served as 'Land Deputy' to Admiral Fieldhouse in the Falklands Conflict has died.

General Sir Richard Trant, KCB, was appointed as senior Army adviser at Northwood when Major General Jeremy Moore headed south to the Falklands, and also took on the Land Deputy role.

General Fieldhouse later

wrote, "Very quickly after he arrived at Northwood, Trant became a leading member of what was now a tri-Service team. Through wise, yet tactfully handled advice. he played a most effective role in the general conduct of the campaign when a heavier hand could well have ruffled feathers."

He died on October 3, 2007, aged 79.

New and improved airbridge? Government pushes for a service which aids economic growth

FLIGHTS between the UK and the Falklands are set to improve following government discussions with the Ministry of Defence (MoD).

Control of seats available to civilian passengers will be in the hands of the government - and the number of seats available will be flexible.

Councillor Summers attended talks with the MoD in London last week. He commented: "The MoD has proposed - and this will be considered by Executive Council next week - that they will sell to the government a number of seats according to our demand. We will then sell them on to our customers. The number of seats will be variable, according to our perception of the demand."

The move is part of renegotiations between the government and MoD on the Joint Position Statement which covers the operation of the airbridge.

The Joint Position Statement is out of date, having been written in the mid-1980s, but this is not the only reason it needs reviewing, Cllr Summers said. "It has been our ambition for some while to try and improve the quality and deliverabilities on the airbridge because, as part of a broader strategy, we believe it is necessary to strengthen the capability and the expandability of the airbridge to take care of potentially all the Falkland Islands' economic requirements."

The reason for this is obvious, he said: "It becomes more and more impossible to see that there will be expansion of flights East and West (from and to South America), there is no sign of any movement on charter flights or the prospect of a second flight to Santiago, and there is no prospect of our discussing scheduled flights with the Argentines in the current climate.

"If we take that as a given, how are we going to manage the development needs that we have for business in general, for tourism in particular, and the potential of oil exploration again next year?" In addition to having greater control of seat allocation, the government will also have the option of calling up a fourth flight every two weeks - at the moment the airbridge only services the Falklands three times a fortnight.

Cllr Summers commented: "Provided the government is willing to pay for it, the MoD says it is happy to provide it. That gives us something very positive to look at or to look forward to, particularly in terms of hydrocarbons drilling next year and whatever might happen after that."

The increased involvement of the government in the operation of the airbridge carries with it a level of risk; however Cllr Summers said it is significantly less than the level of risk the government was prepared to take on the establishment of the Lan flight. He commented: "It means we are effectively a party to charter contract and its administration and gives us a lot more visibility in terms of how the thing operates."

This is a time of considerable change, he believes, not only in

the approach to the way the Joint Position Statement is written but also in the way the government works with the MoD.

He hopes others will get on board: "There is very significant potential for the tourism industry and others to get involved in this new approach by perhaps sharing the risk with the government by buying seats well in advance that are then guaranteed."

Looking into the future, Cllr Summers revealed that, if the agreement works well, there could be an opportunity for a fully commercial operation - "leaving the MoD to do their own thing" - a prospect he believed the MoD found attractive.

The current contract for the operation of the airbridge is due to end in September 2008. The government will have a say in the tender process for the next contract, and therefore needs to discuss the Joint Position Statement review as a matter of urgency with a view to it being in place early next year, Cllr Summers said.

THE Education Ordinance makes it the duty of the Director of Education, "to contribute to the spiritual, moral, mental and physical development of the people of the Falkland Islands."

It is a simple enough statement, but in fact prompts as many questions as it answers. What is meant by "to contribute"? Should a spiritual contribution be of one faith only? Is the wording of the Ordinance still relevant in an increasingly secular society?

It was suggested during last week's Education Board that the introduction of Christian assemblies would be a suitable remedy for the secularisation of our society, benefiting children who do not receive spiritual guidance at home.

However, to equate a lack of Christianity with neglect is offensive to the one third of the Falklands population who identified themselves as being of no religion in last year's census. For many people, being of no religious faith is a positive and informed choice which they wish to pass on to their children just as a Christian or Muslim may pass on their faith.

There is no shortage of opportunities for parents to introduce their children to faith without forcing their choice on others – and yet when we look through the open doors of our Sunday schools, we do not see full pews.

To force children and parents to choose between Christianity and exclusion in our schools smacks of evangelism at best, and at worst teaches children the dangerous lesson that religion leads to division.

That is not to say that religious leaders should be banned from schools. A series of visits from each of the many faith groups in the community to explain their beliefs and worship would make a valuable contribution to the curriculum. As well as opening the door to children who want to explore a particular faith further in their own time, such classes would teach pupils one of the most important life lessons: That different people can believe passionately in different - even contradictory - things, and that all are worthy of respect and understanding.

It is true that we have a state religion. In the UK, however, parents have choices ranging from mono-faith schools to those where no faith is taught. In a small community with no such choices, we are beholden to make our classrooms equally welcoming to those of all shades of belief and of none.

Teachers can and should instill a sense of morality in their pupils, but that is not the same as promoting a particular faith. Let us continue to be proud of our diversity and tolerance, and encourage people to pursue their own beliefs and passions with as much vigour as they choose – and to respect others' rights to do the same without fear of exclusion or stigma.

Brakes on Byron Heights road

THE construction of the road to Byron Heights has been put on hold.

Despite the accommodation for the road building gang having already been moved north from Crew Harbour, the brakes are on the beginning of construction.

The hold-up has stemmed from discussions between the government and the Ministry of Defence (MoD) about the military's projected use of the new ferry service, which is planned to begin next year.

As the decision loomed as to whom the ferry contract would be awarded, an understanding grew between the MoD and the government that the military would be reducing their own chartered fleet in the Islands and making use of the ferry but no actual agreement was reached.

The Chief Executive at the time, Chris Simpkins, was pressured by councillors to secure an agreement with the MoD before they committed to the selected ferry bidder. He reported to councillors that he had reached what looked like a satisfactory solution for both mountain-top reconstruction work and future use of the ferry, based on a cost-sharing scenario. ExCo agreed to vary the road building programme to build the roads up Mt Alice and Byron Heights at cost, on the clear understanding that the ferry was to be used for construction traffic and future support.

However, when ExCo was asked to confirm that "at cost" meant the normal government overhead charge of 33% would not be applied, it became apparent that the MoD were no longer going to commit to using the ferry for construction works.

Covers off sports field but geese move in

THE Leisure Centre manager is hopeful that the partly resurfaced football pitch will be able to reopen in the near future.

Steve Dent was reluctant to commit to an actual date, but he said the resurfacing work - which led to the field being closed for over a year - had moved on well.

It's not all good news, however - the felt covering was removed from the reseeded areas of the field to allow them to get some sun, but the pitch has now become a feeding ground for Upland Geese.

Steve commented, "There is so much food there for the geese at the moment. They don't even bother standing to eat - they are eating while lying down on the grass."

Streamers have been placed on parts of the field to scare off the birds and, if these prove successful, more are likely to be used.

A gas-powered bird scarer is also in use - at the recommendation of Stanley Growers - and Steve is encouraging dog owners to get in on the effort: "Anyone who wants to exercise their dogs on the pitch, the more the better. We've got to scare the birds off." issue, Councillor Mike Summers revealed: "ExCo concluded (subsequently ratified by Standing Finance Committee) that we would continue with the Mt Alice road without the addition of the overhead - ie at a subsidised rate to MoD - but that we would wait and see about Byron. There was little incentive to offer a cheap deal and continue to deprive others of their roads if there was to be no return to FIG through the use of the ferry."

It takes considerable time and effort to move a team from one end of West Falkland to the other and roads engineer Bob Hancox said he had hoped all the administrative issues would be sorted out by the time the road gang was ready to start road construction. However, as this turned out not to be the case, they had to change their plans.

In the short term, he said, the road gang will carry out other works with the team being split up: "Some will carry out grading, some will work on road maintenance which has been required for some time and a couple of chaps will boost the team working towards Shallow Harbour."

If construction towards Byron Heights cannot be started shortly, he added, they could instead build the road towards Westley and also put a short piece of road to Channel Hill allowing access to one of the new Cable and Wireless sites: "Both of these can be worked from the new camp location but both roads will require to be approved by council before any action is taken."

In the meantime Mr Hancox was hopeful an agreement could soon be reached with the MoD and the road gang could revert to their original programme.

Bail conditions changed

CHANGES have been made to the bail conditions of a man charged with the rape of a child under the age of 13.

Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson approved the changes on October 12 following an application from Crown prosecutors.

The man cannot be named for legal reasons.

Book bonanza after forty years of friendship

Thousands of books offered to library by man who loves the Islands - but has never seen them

A FORTY-YEAR friendship has resulted in an incredible gift of hundreds – perhaps thousands – of old and rare books to Stanley library.

Librarian Ron Newman first wrote to the Falkland Islands library in the 1960s, hoping to forge a link with a community in a part of the world that had long fascinated him.

His opposite number in Stanley, Stuart Booth, replied to the letter, and the pair struck up a correspondence that has lasted four decades.

Mr Newman has now offered to donate to Stanley library as much of his own private book collection as staff can accept - a collection which runs to 50,000 books. As well as titles relating to the polar regions, it includes classics of literature, rare first editions, and items dating back as far as the 1600s.

The education department has agreed to accept as many of the books as can be shipped and accommodated. It is hoped to send an expert to view the books and select the most suitable volumes for the library's special collection, which is made up of titles with particular local or historic interest.

It is not the first donation that Mr Newman, who is from the United States, has made to the library. Falklands readers have benefited for years from books which had been given to his own library but did not suit their collection.

Mr Booth recalled: "He was interested in the Islands and he wrote to me when I was librarian, and he also sent parcels of books, which of course went into the library. This went on for quite a long time - about two or three times a year we wrote, and he sent two or three parcels of books a year."

Sadly, Mr Newman has never visited the Islands himself, but Mr Booth said this had not diminished his interest in the area: "He's always been interested in the southern islands. He wanted to go down to the French islands- Kerguelen and the Crozet Islands - he even learned French in order to be accepted, but couldn't get permission to go down.

"What he has, and wants to send down, are really some superb books concerning this part of the world." Although they have never met

in person, Stuart describes him as a "Large, quite happy-go-lucky soul."

Mr Newman's most recent letter to the library reads: "Most of these books are first editions or important later editions. And while I have one first edition book pubhshed as early as 1631, and quite a few others published during the 1700s, most of the books I'm offering are published in the 1800s or 1900s. There is no place on earth I would rather have them go," he added.

Current librarian. Colleen Biggs, said the books would be an important addition to the special collection, which already has a number of rare books: "We have things like first editions of Mawson's *The Home of the Blizzard*, and we have something signed by Ernest Shackleton and several of his men. It would be wonderful to receive the books, though then we'll be faced

with the problem of where to keep them. Once we have some idea of the quantity, then we can make plans."

The library's special collection is also currently being improved through restoration work carried out by former Stanley resident, John Chilton. Although he has now returned to the UK, Mr Chilton has said he will be happy to continue the work book by book. If they can be transported to the Falklands Government Office in London.

Parents divided over religious assemblies proposal

IF THERE'S one issue that is guaranteed to divide opinion, it is the question of whether God has a place in schools.

It is unsurprising, therefore, that the idea of reintroducing Christian assemblies - raised by Clir Janet Robertson at the Education Committee last week - has been both welcomed and rejected by parents.

A number of parents contacted Penguin News to express their displeasure at the reintroduction of the assemblies. One mother who did not wish to be named summed up the feeling: "There are such brilliant ways of teaching moral education to children it doesn't have to be steeped in myth...

"I'm dead against it - I object to my children being taught that the world was created in six days 10,000 years ago. I am appalled it was brought up in this way, without any consultation with parents first."

Fellow parent Julie Bellhouse feels it is wrong for the government to endorse religious speech in schools. "The government's power should not be used to control, support or influence whether our children choose religion or not. It should be neutral in its relations with religious believers and non-believers, it should not be the adversary of any religious group. "The school should at all times

"The school should at all times be secular in its teaching, this should include any teachers or speakers that are brought in to the school. Our schools aren't owned and run by the church. Religion is a choice and should not be forced upon our children or anyone. If you choose to study religion you make an informed choice to do so."

Alison Inglis is a Christian and believes that every parent has a responsibility to promote their child's moral and spiritual development: "If a parent wants to share their personal morality or religion with their child, they can do so in many ways, for example through story, song or discussion, and where appropriate by arranging for their child to participate in Family Services, Sunday School and similar activities."

That said, she feels schools should support parents by creating a caring and nurturing environment which promotes public service and respect for others while encouraging children to explore their own values and beliefs. "Worship and

"As a Christian, I would be very glad to see regular Christian-based religious education re-introduced into our schools. Headbutt outside Trough results in fine

A YOUNG man who headbutted a teenager has been fined £200 and ordered to pay prosecution costs of £70. Daniel Ford (19) admitted assaulting the 17 year-old boy outside the

It's spring and the wildlife | Second Creek - 'We don't yet know the final cost'

COUNCILLOR Mike Summers is worried the public is not clear on what aspects of the new ferry terminals have been approved.

At their meeting last month members of Executive Council (ExCo) approved the construction of the ferry terminal at New Ha-ven on East Falkland at a cost of £1.185m and the building of a temporary jetty at Port Howard which will cost around £70,000. Both projects are to be carried out this summer - work at Newhaven has already begun. Funding for the permanent West Falkland terminal at Second Creek, however, has not yet been approved.

Cllr Summers commented: "The temporary jetty will allow the govemment time to see exactly what is needed at Second Creek and what it will cost.

The decision to site the permanent terminal at Second Creek was against a recommendation from the Transport Advisory Committee (TAC) - who opted to have it near the Port Howard settlement - however TAC Chair, Cllr Mike Rendell, said there was no resentment on the part of the committee.

He commented, "When TAC recommended the Port Howard option it was with a strongly held belief that this would be much less expensive to build than the Second Creek option. No costings were known when TAC sat; subsequently ExCo was advised that there was little price variance in the two locations, and so the earlier TAC thinking was no longer valid." He continued: "The other fac-

tor that TAC took into account was that a permanent ferryhead was achievable at Port Howard this season. The Second Creek option requires a temporary ramp at Port Howard until completion of the permanent ferryhead (which will be towards the end of next season at the earliest).

"The temporary ramp will not allow full operation in all tidal states, which will inevitably mean that a full service cannot operate. However, because in the long term Second Creek should give more room for expansion than the settlement option, I conceded this point at ExCo.

Cllr Rendell said the terminals will be discussed at the next TAC meeting but added: "It will be with the clear understanding that TAC advises ExCo, who do not have to take the advice."

Vessel owners

The new coastal shipping contract is to be operated by Workboat Services Ltd (WBS). Company spokesman Stuart Wallace said WBS had had "an input" into the infrastructure requirements for the provision of a safe and regular service but this was not part of the tender

He commented: "As far as the West terminal is concerned we could work from either site but we do consider that at Second Creek breakwater protection is necessary

WBS own the vessel, not the government, Mr Wallace said, and are therefore responsible for its operation and maintenance. WBS tendered for the provision of a vessel, meeting criteria set out by the government at the time, aimed at significantly improving the service between East and West Falklands.

"Subsequently we agreed to a conversion for it to take passengers across the sound. Work is progressing on this now," Mr Wallace said.

Remorseful man admits assault

AN MPA man broke down in court on Wednesday as he heard the prosecutor describe how he had assaulted his ex-girlfriend after she ended their relationship.

Leon Legg admitted putting his hand around Nikita Leo's throat and threatening her as he pushed her onto the bed in her room at MPA. However, the court heard that the attack was completely out of character. and that Mr Legg had expressed great remorse.

He pleaded guilty to the charge of common assault, and told the court! "I didn't mean for any of this to happen and I'm sorry for what I've done to her. I just want to put this all behind me." He was fined £130 plus costs.

Tamar was built in Norway in 1979, and so is subject to annual checks by the Norwegian Classification Society Det Norsk Veritas (DNV).

DNV carried out a thorough inspection, comparing her current condition to original drawings, examining everything from the hull, engines and rudder to the cooker in the galley.

Tim Cotter, of vessel owners, the Falkland Islands Development Corporation, told *Penguin News*: "In the main the hull was fine and the major steelwork repair we anticipated wasn't required.

"Even so, there was quite a long list of mechanical and electrical items to check through, which is quite normal for a ship of this age.

"We also got the life-saving and fire equipment overhauled and two crew members have been away for seamanship training."

The vessel is due to leave Punta Arenas today or tomorrow, arriving in Stanley on Monday. She will return to operation with a north coastal voyage on Wednesday.

More engine work will be carried out in November when spare parts arrive, but this is not expected to disrupt her schedule.

Digital television proposal goes to ExCo

A PROPOSAL to bring digital TV to the Falkland Islands are to be discussed by Executive Council next week.

The news comes in the wake of repeated problems with the current television service in Camp, which broadcasters say are caused by ageing equipment.

The new system would carry both BFBS 1 and 2 to homes in Stanley and Camp, along with radio broadcasts. Government Secretary Pete King said: "Government has been considering options for the delivery of television services to Camp, but this is a proposal from SSVC for the replacement of the Camp system with a digital satellite-delivered system. It will also change the structure of the delivery to Stanley. There would be set-top boxes in Stanley and a small satellite dish and decoders for houses in Camp."

Councillor Mike Summers, who holds the communications portfolio, said he hoped a new

system could be agreed as soon as possible: "In the meantime we are suffering a bit of a breakdown that's hard to fix.

"Everybody is terribly sorry that the Camp has had these difficulties but I think SSVC has done what they can to try and fix the problem and I don't think it's anybody's fault.

"There's certainly a light at the end of the tunnel, but like all lights at the end of tunnels, it's expensive." Former Stanley resident and BFBS engineer Adrian Almond is to make a special visit to the Falklands in November to help current engineer Stuart Holmes try to solve the technical hitches.

BFBS Technology's senior project manager, Mark Edgar, said: "We are very sorry for the problems which have been caused by a combination of generator failure, consequent snow and ice ingress. the general age of the equipment and unavailability of spares."

Bomb disposal expert dies in Lebanon

A MINE disposal expert who was formerly based in the Falklands has been killed in Lebanon while clearing cluster bombs.

Craig Appleby, 36, from Farnham in Surrey, received fatal injuries when a bomblet exploded in the south of the country.

He had been in Lebanon for a month, working for ArmorGroup Mine Action, a UK-based company.

Mr Appleby served in the

Army as a bomb disposal officer and as a mine action instructor to British, Nato and local troops worldwide. As well as serving in the Falkland Islands, Mr Appleby also toured in Bosnia, Kenya, Kosovo and Kuwait.

After leaving the Army, he worked as an explosives ordnance disposal adviser and trainer in Saudi Arabia, Libya and Rwanda. He was married to Amelia, a Falkland Islander.

Q WHY are ExCo papers, agendas and minutes of committee meetings not available on the FIG website?

A Our thanks to the government's Clerk of Councils and PR Officer. Claudette Anderson for her response. "Work is currently in progress to develop the FIG website www.falklands.gov.fk further with the web designer and government's consultants Keene PR. Particular emphasis is being paid to the addition of the Legislature Department page and relevant links. The intention is to include public Executive Council papers and other useful information which could include a link to other Committee information."

Q HOW soon after a meeting of Legislative Council are transcripts available to the public? Transcripts of UK Parliamentary proceedings are available within one or two days, why does it take so long in the Falklands?

A Ms Anderson responded: "A transcript of the proceedings of Legislative Council is produced shortly after each sitting, normally within a week. However, the document is in draft form until the following sitting of Legislative Council where it is confirmed and then becomes a public document. We would be happy to review the need for release to await confirmation if there is public demand." Q IS THE laying of the new pipes and drainage being done by McLee Ltd as the road capping progresses on West Falkland? Is there going to be a clerk of works on site at all times?

A Roads Engineer Bob Hancox answered this question: "Yes, some replacement and some additional drainage pipes will be installed by McLee Ltd as part of the capping contract. There will not be a clerk of works on site full time but periodic visits will be made by PWD staff. The contractor is fully aware of his responsibilities though and as he will be operating on public roads there will no doubt be plenty of feedback on all activities."

Q WITH the expectation of greatly increased tourist visitors this year, how many public toilets are available in Stanley and what extra facilities are available for landing or departing passengers at the public jetty to cater for this increase?

A Liz Dimmlich (Acting General Manager of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board (FITB) provided this response: "A quick count of the public amenities available in Stanley and immediate surrounds shows there are 42 toilets and 16 urinals at seven different locations - this number does not include the Town Hall, pubs or restaurants.

"Members of FITB and the gen-

eral public can be assured that the development of additional public amenities for tourists (both in Stanley and Camp) is high on FITB's list of priorities. Several different options are currently being assessed, with thought being given to both long-term (permanent facilities) and short-term (portable) solutions.

"To cater for the large increase in cruise ship visitor numbers entering Stanley. FIG was recently approached about the possibility of converting the Old Exchange Building on Victory Green to public toilets.

"Executive Council subsequently tasked the Public Works Department with assessing the feasibility of a conversion, and with producing relevant designs and costs.

ing relevant designs and costs. "Director of PWD Manfred Keenleyside has confirmed that a conversion of the building would be possible, and (pending FIG funding approval in the 2008/09 budget) the project could be completed towards the end of the 2008/09 financial year. FITB will be discussing this issue at the coming Board meeting on Monday, November 5."

Q HOW frequently does the Public Works Committee meet? When was the last meeting? Why hasn't the member with responsibility for Public Works arranged a meeting more recently?

A PWD portfolio holder. Councillor Richard Cockwell responded: "The PWD Committee only meets on an ad hoc basis when there are matters to discuss - it would be counter-productive to hold meetings if there is nothing to discuss.

"It has been some time since we met due to the fact that most matters such as the ferry terminals, roads, etc are covered by other committees. However the Director of Public Works and I agreed a while ago that there should be a meeting in late October or early November as amongst other matters it will be possible to brief the Committee on progress of various projects, not least the wind farm, the heat recovery system and the pumped sewage programme.

"A date for this meeting should be agreed within the next few days and an agenda will be published."



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'Isolation worsening on West'

THE subject of the cost of the proposed ferry and terminals seems to have raised a lot of heat - but not so much light.

I think the most sensible obser-vations came from Bill Pole-Evans in a previous issue where he described the sort of operation he saw in Chile from Punta Arenas.

As he said - this is exactly the sort of operation we need here. I have seen similar operations around the Scottish and Greek Islands - and both areas can throw up some pretty foul weather at short notice.

Mr Passfield is talking through the back of his neck too - maybe Shetland can go for an all singing, all dancing port on the back of their oil money. We haven't got any of that - yet.

Neither Port Howard nor Newhaven need a "well built harbour with breakwaters" - they just need a basic ferry terminal for a basic ferry.

That's another point - is the ferry itself turning into another Tamar-type disaster? Remember how we were to have this wonderful vessel with a Ro-Ro ramp at the rear and a side ramp to load vehicles and stock? In my time I have seen the rear ramp down once at Port Howard and never the side ramp.

Suitable ferries must be available almost off the shelf but no, we have to get stuck with something costing millions and needing (like Tamar) huge costly alterations and it appears to be receding ever further into the future.

Sometimes I feel like Peter Robertson did about the roads about the only vehicle I will drive on to the ferry will be my wheelchair. And yes, I think we would have been better with the Western Marine option.

On another note - unless you live on West Falkland you cannot appreciate the feeling of total isolation of late - it just gets worse. No ferry, no fuel deliveries, no cargo deliveries, no television.

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

Falklands is a 'secular' society

IT SEEMS to me that Councillor Robertson is out of touch when she states that the Falklands is overwhelmingly a Christian country

The Falklands is overwhelmingly a secular society. To support this opinion, I offer the view of a former Governor's wife, a woman who held deeply religious convictions. She loved the Falklands very much but stated that she could never settle permanently in such a secular society. If Councillor Robertson

wishes to change that status quo, she must focus on families, and on parental responsibility to provide spiritual values and guidance, if they so wish.

Councillor Robertson argues that, in the area of religious education, it is not enough that educators provide information. knowledge and an understanding of the world, but that they should also be inculcating spiritual values. The provision of information, knowledge, and an understanding of the world is an almost classic definition of the word, 'education'. In my view, the provision of spiritual values does not fall within that definition.

Children learn by early example and experience, but they need models on which to form their values, spiritual or otherwise. Those values should be provided by the home and the examples set therein.

If families choose not to instil Christian values in their children, that is their business, their choice, and not the business of legislators, in a democracy, to countermand that choice by imposing their version of spiritual values, Christian or otherwise, on anyone.

Caruana wins Gibraltar election

THE Social Democrat leader, Peter Caruana, has easily won the general election in Gibraltar, allowing him to retain his position as Chief Minister for the next four years.

Mr Caruana won over eight and a half thousand votes, while his main opposition, the Socialist leader, Joe Bossano, trailed behind with a little over six thousand votes. Two independent candidates won a tiny percentage of the votes. For the first time in recent years, the election campaign did not focus on Spain's 300-year-old claim to the territory. Instead, candidates concentrated on domestic issues, including improving conditions for workers and pensioners.

Gibraltarian commentators say Mr Caruana's success in the election was most likely due to the stable economic situation in the territory.

Fresh hope for rare gum tree on St Helena

TEN new specimens of a critically endangered tree have been discovered on St Helena.

As *PN* reported last month, only two examples of the endemic bastard gumwood were thought to exist on the island, and these had been badly damaged in a recent storm.

However, a further ten trees which had once been given up for dead have just been discovered alive and well.

They were part of a "gene bank" planted in a field behind the island's conservation nursery at Scotland and abandoned after the trees were thought to have died.

Seeds collected from the plants are now germinating in the nursery, giving fresh hope for the survival of the plant.

Rebecca Caims-Wicks of the St Helena National Trust said: "The find is a significant one and could make the difference between life and extinction for the species."

Borders & Southern has contracted a 3D seismic survey in the South Falkland Basin to commence on <u>Saturday 27th October</u> 2007

The 3D seismic survey will be undertaken by the survey vessel "OCEAN EXPLORER", radio call sign C6TU4 (CHARLIE SIX TANGO UNIFORM FOUR). The "OCEAN EXPLORER" has a red hull and tan superstructure and will be towing six, 6300 metre seismic streamers with a separation of 100 metres between streamers and a seismic airgun source consisting of two arrays.

The distance from the stern of the vessel is approximately 6500 metres to the tailbuoys at the end of each streamer. Each tailbuoy is equipped with a radar reflector and a flashing white light. The light flashes the letter U (UNIFORM) dot-dot-dash; the tailbuoys are not synchronised.

The OCEAN EXPLORER will be accompanied by guard vessel AMBER G, call sign HO3292 (HOTEL OSCAR THREE TWO NINE TWO). The AMBER G has a blue hull and white super-structure.

The survey lines are oriented in an east-west direction and are bound by the following coordinates:

The tables bore decorations of diddle dee, fern and white grass in tin cans, and the walls sported a painted horse and



Wool market report for week ending October 12, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices increased at the fine end of the micron spectrum but struggled somewhat at the broader end in Australia last week. Prices increased in South Africa (generally finer wool) but fell in New Zealand (ge nerally broader wool).

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, price increases were between 7 and 21 pence per kilogram clean for fleece wool lots finer than 23 micron while price changes were between +6 and -2 p/kg clean for fleece wool lots broader than 24 micron.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finis hed the week up 11 p/kg clean at 415.4 p/ kg clean compared to the previous weeks closing level of 404.4 pence per kilogram clean.

Buying interest was strong with a broad mix of Asiam and European activity.

In Australia last week 93% of the 57,445 bales offer ed to the trade changed hands. In cluded in the offering were 6.20-4 bales of crossbred wool of which 85 % were sold. In New Zemland 77% of the 9,447 bales avai lable were sold while in South A frica very strong demand saw 9.5% of the 7,740 bales sold. Next week approximately 70,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in South Africa, Australia and New Zealand. Note:



Treasury behind in financial reporting to councillors

THE Treasury is behind in its financial reporting to councillors and a lack of manpower has been blamed.

Quarterly financial management reports are supposed to be submitted to Standing Finance Committee (SFC) however there has been no report since SFC met in April. SFC is due to meet this morning and once again no report is included on the agenda.

Financial Secretary Derek Howatt said the report due in July was held back as a matter of routine because the figures would not have included information such as year-end accounting adjustments and a "confusing picture" would have resulted: "The year-end report is therefore usually omitted until the accounts are produced."

There should, however, have been a report submitted to today's meeting reporting up to September 30. However, with no Chief Accountant currently at the Treasury it proved impossible to meet the report deadline, Mr Howatt said.

Heritage concerns grow as Deans' smithy is demolished

THE debate on the preservation of the Falklands' historic buildings stepped up a gear this week as it emerged that the Falkland Islands Company (FIC) had demolished the former JM Dean & Son smithy without planning permission.

Heritage Councillor Richard Davies said he was "very disappointed" by the loss of the building, which made up the western end of the Basics shop: "It was a building of known historic importance, originally built as Deans' smithy and sail loft. The brick façade at the north side, although tucked out of sight next to the boundary with Stanley House, was particularly attractive with its big windows and arched doorway."

He warned: "In the 1970's UK planners and developers did more damage to their built heritage than the Luftwaffe did in the Blitz. Fortunately Britain still has a lot of buildings and historic towns left. We don't have so many here. Once they are gone, they are gone forever."

Archivist Jane Cameron said the smithy was built in the 1860s by FIC's then rivals, JM Dean & Son, who were among the earliest settlers on the Islands.

She commented: "It is very sad to see it go - historically because of its age and the Dean connection - and architecturally because we have so few brick buildings in the Falklands and this was a particularly attractive example."

FIC Director Roger Spink said he had been wrongly advised about previous demolitions: "We consulted the planning officer and building advisor when demolishing the skin shed at the old butchery and part of the carpenter's shop behind our offices and were told, 'Unless it is a historic building or other special thing, like a wreck or a stone corral or something in a national nature reserve, it does not need planning permission.' We have since the demolition of the rear of Basics been advised by FIG that this information was incorrect."

Regardless of advice, Mr Spink said he did not think the smithy should have been preserved, and its demolition would allow FIC to update its facilities: "If it was such a historic building, why in the last 10 years has no one approached us to have it listed? The building has been altered so much that the bits that people thought were there aren't there anyway.

"There was a brick wall at the end of it but you couldn't see it unless you had a mirror on a stick." He said the building had been damp and "a harbour for vermin".

The current Environmental Planning Officer, Andrea Wright, said she had this week written to builders reminding them that planning permission was required for demolition of all buildings.

activists hidden around the place were reported to have thrown their arms up in desperation, feeling utterly defeated at the news that the old Dean's smithy had been bulldozed.

Many people may not have even known the building existed - it was tucked in the back of the West Store complex, rotting away and becoming a luxury pad for rats, according to the FIC. Now that it is gone, however, one can be forgiven for feeling a sense of loss - for yet another connection with our early settlers has disappeared.

Sadly, it appears that a misunderstanding between the government and the FIC has led to the smithy's demise however this episode highlights the need for a more concerted effort - a multi-agency effort - for the protection of central Stanley's character.

Almost without exception Falkland Islanders place enormous importance on the conservation of wildlife - after all, it is one of our greatest attractions - but care for our historic buildings (and even more simply, architectural traditions) does not seem to be nearly such a priority.

If you live in Stanley it is easy to take for granted the picturesque character that the town has: when tourists mention it we tend to be a bit surprised by their enthusiasm - in fact, many laughed when a visiting tourism consultant once suggested that Stanley should be considered for World Heritage Status. But would that really have been such a bad thing?

We all cringe at the term 'quaint' but hey, if quaint sells, surely we can live with it. As Cllr Davies said to PN this week, the Falklands are about more than penguins and 1982.

For years we have bemoaned the lack of investment from the government in making the Islands a more attractive place to visit. Protecting the character of the town would not necessarily carry a hefty price tag and yet we haven't done it. Why?

Some may have concerns about whether commercial development and historic conservation can work hand in hand. I put this to one of the Falklands' most ardent campaigners for historic building conservation, Jane Cameron, and she was able to cite numerous examples - the Fisherman's Wharf area of San Francisco, Covent Garden in London, the Quays in Dublin, Les Halles in Paris and countless others world-wide, from which we can see that a well-preserved historic environment enhances and adds value virtually to every activity that takes place there.

It's easy to joke about the "Hysterical Buildings Committee" but perhaps it's time we - both the government and the community at large listened to the message these people are promoting.

Our built heritage forms a precious resource for understanding and enjoying our past, and we have to safeguard it for future generations -before it's too late.

Foot and mouth - why different measures?

AN APPARENT double standard in procedures for preventing foot and mouth disease has annoyed passengers arriving in the Islands on the airbridge.

A member of the Rural Business Association submitted a question to Tuesday's public meeting asking why passengers arriving on the Saturday Lan flight were not screened to the same extent as their airbridge counterparts.

Airbridge passengers currently have to wait on the aircraft (which drives into the hangar at Mount Pleasant) for over an hour after landing. They are then required to present all footwear for inspection.

Lan passengers, by contrast, simply have to fill in a bio-security form declaring whether or not they have been on a farm in the past 30 days. If they have, their footwear is examined and cleaned.

The Director of Agriculture Phyl Rendell said the bio-security form was a check which worked well: "They are able to discern and screen people who have been on a farm.'

She said the Department of Agriculture had not asked for everyone arriving on the airbridge to be screened for foot and mouth but that staff at Mount Pleasant were having trouble discerning who had been on a farm or in the zone where foot and mouth is present.

Councillor Clausen asked if the same bio-security measures used for Lan could be used for the airbridge. Mrs Rendell responded: "We asked for that but the MoD has not been able to do it."

Addressing concern about negative impacts the current level of capital expenditure has had on the government's finances, Mr Howatt asserted there was "nothing to hide" and added that, subject to completion of the work required to produce the year end financial statements, it is intended that all will be revealed in a report to be submitted to the November meeting.

Mr Howatt commented: "FIG operates on an annual budget cycle I July to 30 June. It is worth noting that, since the 2007/08 budget was set with an estimated surplus of £322,120, SFC has approved up to the September meeting, supplementary expenditure of £335,790 in respect of the carryover of underspends in the previous financial year (2006/07) SFC was satisfied that the carryovers were necessary to meet the incidence of expenditure which was committed in 2006/07.

"The details are recorded in the open minutes of the meeting held on August 24, 2007. No other supplementary expenditure has been approved to date." He added, "Over the past

three months SFC has also noted movements within budgets as detailed in the first three Virement Reports of 2007/08 as issued with the open part of the agenda."

Marines reinforce 'a special connection'

A TRAINING visit by more than a hundred Royal Marine reservists has been hailed as a great success.

The group returned to the UK on Saturday after their two-week visit, and there are hopes that it will be the first of many.

They began their exercise by yomping from San Carlos to Onion Range, where they carried out a live fire exercise.

The reservists carry out a twoweek exercise every year, but this is the first time they have made the trip to the Falklands.

It was not the first visit, however, for organiser Lieutenant Colonel John Davies, or eight other members of the group, who were veterans of the 1982 conflict

Lt Col Davies said: "For them

it was an opportunity to come back, and some of the guys were saying that those that didn't come down have missed out. We're really pleased with the way it's gone - everybody's said they've learned a lot in terms of training, but they've seen the Islands too.

"There's a really special connection between the Royal Marines and the Islands and we've reinforced that."

The group went on a number of battlefield tours, visiting Two Sisters, Mount Harriet and Mount Longdon. They paid their respects at San Carlos cemetery and attended a drinks reception at Government House. They also had the chance to meet retired members of the Corps now hving in the Falklands and to inspect the new memorial to the Royal Marines which is being constructed near Government House.

Lt Col Davies said the whole trip had been a pleasant surprise for many of the group: "Everybody's been really friendly and it's been great. A lot of them didn't know what to expect really. You think it's such a remote, windswept place but there's a lot more to it than first meets the eye."

He said the trip was such as success that it could be the first of many: "The Brigadier [Commander of British Forces, Brigadier Nick Davies] is very keen to promote the place as somewhere troops come from the UK to exercise. There are some issues with vehicle support and helicopter availability, but if they build a road up to Onion Range it'll be pretty straightforward."

GRANTS of up to £1,000 are on offer for projects that benefit conservation in the Falklands.

The Conservation Grant Scheme is now in its fourth year, and offers support for a whole range of work.

Grants can be given for education projects, such as site leaflets, or for practical work such as tussac planting or fencing which help the conservation of sensitive sites.

Director of Falklands Conservation, Grant Munro, said: "There are no strict rules as to what sorts of projects can be funded. The main guiding principle is that in some way the wildlife and the environment of the Falklands must benefit."

He said the funding did not have to be for highly technical projects: "We hope that the grant scheme will encourage people to look at the opportunities around them or at that favourite weekend spot and consider the small things that they could do to help – but without being out of pocket."

Ferry manager named

In court this week

THREE separate cases were heard in court on Wednesday.

Wayne McCormick pleaded not guilty to assisting a detained person to escape and had his case adjourned - a pre-trial hearing will take place in a month's time.

The trial of Simon Reid, who has denied a charge of kidnap, is scheduled to begin on November 5 and expected to last three days.

David Lambert, who is charged with drink driving, is to seek new legal representation after his counsel. David Lang, told the court he had "professional" difficulties and had to withdraw from the case.

Mr Lambert's case was adjourned for seven days.

Youth court

The trial of a youth who is charged with drinking alcohol in a private place, which was scheduled to be held yesterday, was adjourned until December at the request of the defence.

New airbridge deal: fares should remain the same

UNDER an agreement yet to be signed by the government, the price of seats on the Ministry of Defence airbridge will be "roughly equivalent" to what they are now, councillors say.

As reported by PN last week, a proposal on the future development of the airbridge was to be considered by Executive Council this week.

At a public meeting held on Tuesday evening Councillor Mike Summers said the pricing structure for seats on the airbridge has not been finalised but he expected it to be similar to the current set up.

He commented: "We anticipate it would be much the same as it currently is but we haven't worked all the maths out yet.

In terms of booking, there will be a better service on offer for members of the public, he said, because the government will have the ability to confirm seats, removing the element of uncertainty which currently exists.

At the moment the government is sticking to the same number of civilian seats as are currently available - 29 southbound and 39 northbound. He explained: "We haven't asked to vary those numbers (because] we think that over the full period of a year they are adequate for us at the moment.

"There are discussions to be had about that and as demand rises, as we hope it will, then we will have to negotiate with the MoD to get more space.

He said the important aspect of the new proposal was flexibility: "Month on month or quarter on quarter - depending on how we end up - we can decide how many seats we want. We don't have to stick with the same ceilings we currently have.

The government will initially act as travel agent for seat bookings, Cllr Summers said, but is keen to see a commercial operator take the booking service over and even-

tually, "buy the risk off us."

A member of the public expressed concern that having a single private operator controlling seats could lead to price hikes - he asked if the government intended introducing a mechanism to control pricing. Cllr Summers said this was something the government would be happy to discuss with the Tourist Board: "I think the government would be interested if any parties in the commercial sector wished to risk

"Would we tell them what they could charge their seats on to cli-ents at? I don't know - we haven't talked about that

Luggage allowances

The MoD airbridge is currently renowned for its generous luggage allowance to Falkland Island passengers - in the region of 54kgs. This is likely to be reduced, but councillors are hopeful it will still be generous. The MoD has proposed a freight allowance which is based on the average of what passengers use on the airbridge now, CIIr Summers said, and this is less than the current allowance. However the government is open to negotiating for a higher allocation, he added.

The rate for freight and excess baggage is set by the MoD and the government has no say in this.

Agriculture report to be publicly discussed

A REPORT on how well the Department of Agriculture is performing alongside its ten year plan is to be considered in a public forum.

The paper, prepared by the Senior Agriculture Advisor Neil Judd. was scheduled to have been discussed in the closed section of yesterday's meeting of the Agricultural Advisory Committee, however it was withdrawn from the agenda earlier this week and will now be discussed publicly at the next meeting

Penguin News asked the Director of Agriculture, Phyl Rendell why the paper was now being held over to the next meeting and whether the delay was to allow time to prevent the department from looking as though it was not performing as well as it should against the 10 year plan. Mrs Rendell asserted that this was not the case - the paper was a work in progress and the delay was a matter of procedure, she said.

She expressed surprise at the inference that the DoA was not performing well: "The DoA must be one of the few departments that has a long term plan linked to the industry it supports and is also one of the most open and up front departments with information," she said

Spring heralds the arrival of BAS

ALONG with the increase in wildlife that spring has brought, Stanley residents will have noticed the return of British Antarctic Survey (BAS) ships and aircraft this week

The RRS James Clark Ross arrived in Stanley on Tuesday. She will be re-supplying stations on South Georgia as well as opening up Signy Station. She is expected back in Stanley on November 19 before heading off for several science cruises in the Drake Passage and then onto Rothera Station for resupply in early December.

The RRS Shackleton is still in the UK and is due to set sail in early November. BAS spokesperson Athena Dinar said: "This season we start the build of our new Halley VI station, so she will operate between Cape Town and Halley only.

All the BAS aircraft are now at Rothera. This year they will operate out of Stanley and Punta Arenas

Ms Dinar said about two thirds of flights in and out of Rothera would be from Stanley, with the remainder from Punta Arenas

"This provides our operations team with maximum flexibility if personnel are delayed and need to transfer flights. In addition, there are more flights in/out of Punta (every day), which is not the case from Stanley.

Scouts join in virtual jamboree

PATIENTS in the Falklands are to benefit from a new type of healthcare as nurse Jane Cotter trains to become a nurse practitioner - and it's all at her own expense.

Nurse practitioners work very differently from traditional practice nurses. While the latter carry out a course of treatment which has been decided on by a doctor, nurse practitioners are qualified to work with patients who walk in off the street with new health problems. They can examine patients, make a diagnosis, recommend treatment, refer patients to consultants, and have expanded prescribing powers.

As part of her training, Jane will hold around six hours of clinics every week, offering an alternative to GP consultations.

Once the clinics are up and running, patients will be offered the option of a consultation with her when they call for a GP appointment.

She will have ready access to doctors during clinics if she needs their advice or expertise.

Jane said: "We are not trying to be a mini-doctor - it's a different role that runs parallel and complementary to that of the doctors."

mentary to that of the doctors." Chief Medical Officer Dr Roger Diggle, who is acting as her training facilitator, said: "The benefits are that for the period of time that Jane is doing her training, we get extra consulting time. The benefit to patients is that they have access to a different person that they can consult.

sult. "There are an awful lot of conditions where people - rightly or wrongly - feel that they don't want to waste the doctor's time or feel embarrassed about going to see them, so people do see it as a very positive option."

Jane has been sitting in on Dr Diggle's clinics for the past six weeks to gain an understanding of the GP's way of working. She said: "It's a steep learning

She said: "It's a steep learning curve, no doubt about it. You go to a certain level in nursing training and then you do things because you are told to do them, whereas I relate this to being almost like a detective. You get a mystery and you have to delve systematically through it."

As well as running the clinics, Jane will carry out distance learning via CDRoms and DVDs, and has already made one study trip to the UK, with two more planned over the next two-and-a-half-years.

Although Falklands patients will benefit from her expertise, Jane is funding the £1,500 cost of the course herself, as there was no money in the medical budget for it, and s he wanted to increase her skills. Dr Diggle said: "This isn't

KEMH sponsored – Jane has decided that this is the training that she wants to do and we are happy to assist. At the moment there is no funding available for such a post, and there has been no decision in the long term. It's not necessarily a service that has been set up to continue indefinitely."

Jane, however, has enough motivation to carry her through: "I just thought that if I wanted to do it, I should get on with it. I thought you've got one life, if you want to do it, get on and do it."



Newhaven port 'Ready by Christmas'

WORK on the Newhaven ferry terminal is progressing to schedule, with Roads Engineer Bob Hancox predicting that it should be finished by the end of the year.

The team on site is currently working 12-hour days to dig the new basin in preparation for the arrival of ferry Concordia Bay, expected in February next year Mr Hancox told PN this week:

"Works are progressing really quite well at the moment.

"There's a bit of concern about the quality of the rock and therefore the stability of the sides, but the design office and Morrison are looking at solutions and it shouldn't be a serious problem." He added: "We hope to be out of these by Christianso"

of there by Christmas." The six-strong gang are currently digging out the dock area, leaving the beach intact to keep the works dry.

When digging is completed,


Morrison will create concrete sidings, and some dredging will be carried out. The beach will then be removed, allowing water to fill the dock.

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Cllr : 'Study of comparative religions should be encouraged'

THE current feeling generated by the debate on religious education/ assemblies in schools has been brought up from time-to-time and deserved a thorough airing.

However, I would like to clarify one or two things: firstly, it was not proposed by me, but by a parent. Secondly, the debate was held in order to seek views on how the Education Ordinance should be interpreted in the matter of "spiritual development". That involves airing arguments, for and against. Without that, there is no debate at all

There are a number of aspects to all religions and faiths, but there are two that most lead to confusion in any discussion of it, including at our meeting.

One relates to the structure of the religion and its central beliefs, the other relates to the moral stances it takes. In the main, whilst the central beliefs can differ widely from one religion to another, the themes of morality, on the whole, are pretty much universal. Religions, traditionally, have been the way different societies inculcate these standards of morality into its members

In my view, the issue of structure and belief is a very personal one and is really a matter of choice. You could argue that a bit like learning to play tennis or the piano, one is unlikely to take it up in adulthood if they haven't learnt the basic skills as a child. Nevertheless, it IS a matter of personal choice and in a generally secular society I don't believe that there is a place for this in the schools – if people feel al-ienated from it, it will be divisive, a point that was raised both at the meeting and your own editorial.

The other facet then is the issue of moral values and good citizenship.

At the meeting it was clearly voiced early on - although that was

not reflected in the media - that if religious assemblies were to be reintroduced then they should take the form of a "moral story and a song" in other words preaching would not be appropriate.

Personally I don't object to this, simply on the basis that whilst most children will get this kind of thing at home in one way or another, many children do not. At no point was lack of Christianity equated with neglect: in this context it is not about faith at all, but about the moral and universal values that faiths uphold.

With this in mind it would appear that the general feeling at the meeting was that the schools, whilst important in the context of moral development of children, are not responsible for spiritual development. A study on comparative religions, although valuable, is about knowledge, not about spiritual development.

Further, there appeared to be no support for religious education, in the traditional sense, as part of the curriculum. There was some support for the concept of morally orientated assemblies, but it was clear from the debate that there were complications on who should lead these assemblies.

If parents can choose to exclude children from these, then even of-fering the role to all faiths in the Islands presents problems of divisiveness, and not least, the practical problems voiced by the Director of Education that would result.

The only conclusion would appear to be, therefore, that the study of comparative religions should be encouraged in order to provide factual knowledge of the beliefs that exist and have existed around the world. Secondly that further discussion on what constitutes moral development, and how this should be achieved, should ensue.

Stunning '82 wood





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Are Una's triplets a Falklands first?

ISLANDER Una McKay thought she'd overdone the excesses of Christmas when she noticed she had gained a bit of a belly over the holiday period.

She knew she was in the early stages of pregnancy at the time but was not prepared for the shock that came with her first scan, on January 3, when her doctor asked if there was any history of twins in the family then added: "Oh, in fact, make that triplets."

While the doctor delightedly called for her consultant to come and see the scan, Una and David, who already have a young son. Harry, both sat with looks of shock on their faces: "It was a most surreal moment and one that we could never have imagined in a million years." Una said.

There are around 10,500 sets of twins born in the UK every year but only 140 triplet pregnancies per year; most are the result of IVF treatment – it is quite rare to have a spontaneous triplet pregnancy. It is also possible these are the first triplets to be born to a Falkland Islander.

Una commented, "I am still trying to figure out the genetic side of things but my granddad, Alexander McClaren (who left the Falklands in 1959 and immigrated to Australia) was one of a twin. One of his daughters, Nina, had twins – one of whom also then went on to have twins.

"All I know is that once you have had one multiple birth, subsequent pregnancies run a high chance of also being multiples."

Following the discovery at the scan. Una was monitored closely throughout the pregnancy and other than moaning a lot about "everything and anything", particularly about her rapid increase in size, the pregnancy was relatively uneventful.

During a routine scan at 33 weeks 'baby number 3' was found to have stopped growing and the babies were delivered seven weeks early by Caesarean section on May 23.

In weight and birth order they are Kaiser (5lb 5oz), Jolie (4lb 8½oz) and Mae (3lb 7oz). They all went straight to the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at Bath's Royal United Hospital where they were kept in incubators to maintain their body temperatures. Mae had a drip for 24 hours and all three babies were initially fed via a nasogastric tube, but other than that they had no problems and did not need any kind of mechanical ventilation.

Una commented: "For babies that were almost two months early they were extremely well and were discharged from hospital within two weeks of being born. They are all thriving and now weighing roughly 17, 15 and 14 pounds respectively." She said Jolie and

Mae appear to be identical twins: "I get them mixed up rather a lot!"

The McKay/Ward household is now chaotic and full to the brim with baby equipment, Una said: "While we try and have lots of calm and routine for the babies it is quite challenging trying to juggle all the feeds, nappy changes, cuddles, weaning, etc, whilst also trying to entertain our lovely little two-year-old, Harry, who is at a really interesting age himself - and not to forget trying to coordinate the endless stream of visitors and well-wishers.

"There have been many times when both David and I have been a little frayed around the edges but we are also very lucky to have had my parents (Heather and Rex McKay) stay with us for many months. They were great and worked so very, very hard. I had to let them go back to the Islands one at a time so that we were not subject to a complete and sudden withdrawal!"

Una and Dave are grateful for the good wishes. cards, presents and visitors they have received over the last five months: "One day (when the babies are about 16 and leaving school) I will take the time to sit down and write thankyou notes to everyone. In the meantime we would like to say a big thank you to everyone through the *PN*."

The babies have attracted interest from local media and Jolie is also getting her fair share of publicity as she has become 'the face' of a campaign called 'Space to Grow' run by the Royal United Hospital to raise £4.5 million to build a new Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.

Una left the islands in 1989 to train as a nurse in Winchester, Hampshire. She has been home many times since, mostly on holidays but also on several work related trips - several years ago she coordinated advanced resuscitation training for the hospital in Stanley and she has been back on some aeromeds during her eight years with 4626 RauxAF Aeromed Sqn based at RAF Lyneham.

She now lives near Bath and works at the University of the West of England in Bristol where she is a resuscitation coordinator – "Quite far removed from the rousey I always thought I would be!"

'South Georgia my mind... on

IN September, the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) was invited by the Commander of British Forces to join Exercise Cape Reach to South Georgia.

The exercise was a joint naval, land and air operation, the scenario being a stricken tourist ship. The FIDF was offered eight


places, and with no lack of volunteers, the priority was junior leadership and future junior leaders.

The team was led by Major Pete Biggs, and apart from myself, comprised LCpl Dustin Gilson-Clarke. Pte Jay Moffatt. Pte Kevin Ross, Pte Matt Newton, Pte Simon Johnson and Pte Jacqueline Bennebroek (Doc).

For the FIDF this was a fantastic professional opportunity to really prove many of the Force's capabilities both in a potential military capacity, and in its search and rescue role.

I am a Mountain Leader and have served on many out-of-area operations throughout my career. but this was to be one I relished for two particular reasons.

As the Permanent Staff In-



structor (PSI) to the FIDF for the past 10 months, I was revelling in the opportunity to really test FIDF members away from the Falkland Islands, their normal theatre of operations.

FIDF members practice all the

variations of their roles in the Falklands, and find that environment relatively comfortable. But any military force will always grow as it learns to cope with a different environment, cultures, security restrictions and planning problems.

Secondly, and on a more personal note. I was last in South Georgia as a young Marine on HMS Endurance in 1987-88. As I quickly approach the final chapter of my service in the Corps. this is the one place I have really wished more than all others to revisit

Time was against us with only two training nights and a weekend to carry out all the pre-de-

ployment training required to safely undertake our task on South Georgia. We started with several lectures on cold weather injuries, avalanche procedures, survival shelters and climbing in cold winter mountainous terrain. We also needed to master ice axe arrest techniques, crampons, snow and rock belays and rope work.

This training finished, we packed all the equipment to de-ploy on HMS Southampton, departing on October 11

Force members were very surprised at the sheer quantity of equipment required to operate safely in South Georgia. The ruck-

sacks were 80lbs upwards and we were going light on some of the more specialised military equipment

The FIDF procured several new items of equipment to be able to operate safely in the mountains. This will add to the existing list of essential equipment required to fulfil the mountain rescue role in the Falkland Islands. Several of the larger features in the Falklands are upwards of 1000ft and in winter present a significant cold weather danger to all who venture out illprepared, so this new equipment



will provide invaluable.

Onboard the training started immediately, with the FIDF team replicating the training we had been cramming in before deploying.

It is hoped that in future the FIDF will provide the "continu-ity factor" in such deployments, and will use the time sailing to South Georgia to train the other parties, such as the RIC, in various military or mountain rescue techniques.

I feel that this is important not only for training purposes, but also in the political sense: It is really positive that Falkland Islanders who understand and appreciate the environmental sensitivity of operating in South Georgia - are taking a lead.

The sea state was not always

conducive to lecturing, but our thanks go to Commander Morris and the team of HMS Southcampton, who without complaint constantly put themselves out to accommodate and often join in and listen to many of the lectures.

The avalanche lectures alone had an audience upwards of 35 people, and many of the seamen commented after the lecture that they had no idea of the risks of avalanches

To the FIDF members these risks became very real when only a few hours after landing. As we established camp at Gull Lake, the audible, ground-shaking sounds of avalanches occurring only a few kilometres away were a reminder of the potential dangers.

We had landed at King Edward Point and moved on foot to Gull Lake. The snow extended right down to the shore line - I had not expected it to be this deep and wet (hands up those who were glad we brought snowshoes!).



The open day raised £725.56. This total was topped up later in the week by visiting members of the Royal Marines who donated £87.63 to the cadets.



Albatross ambassadors on the land

Continuing our ACAP series, this week we look at the role of Falklands farmers as conservationists

ACROSS the southern regions of the Atlantic, Pacific and Indian Oceans, fly the albatrosses and petrels.

They are in search of food to build up their fat reserves so that they can return to land, mate, incubate an egg and provide for a hungry, growing chick.

The survival of two of the albatross and petrel species – blackbrowed albatross and southern giant petrel - rests, environmentalists say, primarily with the Falkland Islands community.

Albatrosses and petrels are among the most threatened birds in the world so seven countries including the United Kingdom and its South Atlantic Overseas Territories, signed up to a multilateral agreement in 2004 called the Agreement for the Conservation of Albatrosses and Petrels (ACAP).

The remote and unpopulated South Georgia is a more typical ACAP breeding site than the Falklands. "We have 43 sites in the Falkland Islands where black-browed albatrosses, southern giant petrels and/or white-chinned petrels breed," said Environmental Officer. Helen Otley. In contrast to other countries, Falklands ACAP sites are owned and managed by 28 different entities. ranging from individuals, families and non-governmental organisations such as New Island Conservation Trust and Falklands Conservation to the government, the Development Corporation and Falklands Landholdings.

Only two ACAP breeding sites in the Falklands- Beauchene Island and Bird Island - have never been farmed or settled, and currently only 21 breeding sites are currently unoccupied and without livestock.

Visits to ACAP breeding sites are kept to an absolute minimum where landowners can ensure this. "The government has a strict permission system for many of its islands, such as Beauchene Island and Bird Island, and only scientists requiring access for critical research given permission to go ashore." explains Helen.

Eddie Anderson who owns land holding one of the largest southern giant petrel populations in the world can show through monitoring of the colony by distant aerial photography that his "hands-off" policy is an effective form of management for these sensitive breeders.

Two of the easiest places to see breeding giant petrels in the Falkland Islands are Sea Lion Island and Pebble Island. To allow visitors to get a little closer than 200 metres without disturbing the breeding birds, land managers on both islands have purpose built hides, which visitors must use to view the birds.

For albatrosses and petrels that call Steeple and Grand Jason home, more strategic management will soon be adopted. Isaac Forster, of Falklands Conservation (FC), explained: "FC is currently co-ordinating the development of a management plan for the islands with the caretakers and landowners (the US-based Wildlife Conservation Society), as well as local stakeholders in government, tourism and conservation."

On Saunders Island, the Pole-Evans family and their 6,000 sheep and 150 beef cattle share the island with 11,000 pairs of black-browed albatrosses. "They are very special to us and we love to share them with the rest of the world," said Suzan Pole-Evans. "Sheep and cattle have lived with penguins and albatross peacefully for the last 150 years, and the only thing that has changed is some of the people that have come to the Islands."

Southern giant petrels also breed on islands with sheep and cattle, such as George, Barren and Speedwell Islands, which are owned by the May family. "We are primarily an agricultural-based business but as with all farms, diversification is the key word and we see all wildlife as an asset to the land," explained Chris May.

On Barren Island, the southern giant petrels breed on a peninsula, which has been fenced to keep visitors and sheep at a safe distance. During November, Chris and his farm workers, with the help of the British Schools Exploring Society and funds provided by the government's environmental studies budget, will construct a small jetty to provide a safe, designated landing site for cruise ship passengers that is well away from the breeding petrels.

In contrast on nearby George Island, the giant petrels breed in many small little pockets along 12 miles of coastline and to make sheep farming economically feasible, the Mays need to use this valuable land. "Our islands have always been open plan and the wildlife and animals interact together, and a member of our team always accompanies the visitors to answer their answers and ensure that the wildlife isn't disturbed." explained Chris.

"We have a fantastic array of wildlife that has helped us turn an almost unviable farm into a sustainable business but our petrels have their downsides because they have a serious impact on our sheep production especially in the spring when our lambs are being born."

Chris sums up the feelings of farmers with ACAP species when he says that. "We are very conservation conscious, as are other people in the same situation, but the unfortunate reality is that we have to make a living. So in some areas, at some times, there will be disturbance and this is both regrettable and unavoidable. All we can do is protect the best we can given the resources we have."

Suzan's message is similar: "I'd personally like to see more money invested both into tourism, so more people can view these magnificent birds, and to carry on the efforts to stop trawlers and longliners killing albatross. No one likes to see an albatross fly past the colony trailing fishing line."

Veteran looks forward to meeting Fitzroy 'kids'

PETER SOUTHERN will be one of more than 200 Falklands War veterans visiting the Islands on a memorial pilgrimage next month.

Prior to his arrival he has been trying to find out about the children he met at Fitzroy in 1982: "I was able to open the little school there right after the cease-fire and wondered if they remembered. I can only remember one name and that was a boy called Owen Lee."

Penguin News has now put Peter in contact with Owen and the two hope to meet during the pilgrimage.

Astronauts snap the Lafonia burn

THERE are no prizes for guessing which way the wind was blowing on September 25, when astronauts on the International Space Station took this spectacular photograph of smoke plumes streaming east from camp burns in Lafonia.

The image was captured by the multinational crew of the station's Expedition 15.

It featured as last week's Image of the Week on the Gateway to Astronaut Photography of Earth website, which offers public access to photographs taken by space station crew members.


Thousands of archived images of the Falklands and other locations around the world are also available on the site.

The crew, which has been in orbit since April 7, is tasked as part of its mission with taking "pictures of Earth that will be of the greatest value to scientists and the public, and to make those images freely available on the Internet."

Wool market report for week ending October 19, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices surged at the fine end of the micron spectrum at sales in South Africa and Australia last week but struggled somewhat at the broader end.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, price increases were between 13 and 26 pence per kilogram clean for fleece wool lots finer than 24 micron while price changes were between + 4 and -2 p/kg clean for fleece wool lots broader than 25 micron. The AWEX "Eastern Market

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up 14 p/kg clean at 429.6 p/ kg clean compared to the previous weeks closing level of 415.4 pence per kilogram clean.

Buying interest was strong with a good mix of European and Asian activity.

In a positive sign for Falkland

Islands farmers, traditional Falkland Islands buyers were very active in the market place.

It should also be noted that well prepared, stain free skirting lines also attracted very strong buying interest last week.

In Australia prices were reported to have approached fleece wool prices on occasions during sales.

In Australia last week 96% of the 51,540 bales offered to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 3,997 bales of crossbred wool of which 88 % were sold.

In South Africa very strong demand saw 99% of the 6,180 bales sold.

Next week approximately 70,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in South Africa and Australia.

Do not need a fishing licence but the daily bag limit is 6 brown trout for all waterways, except for the Murrell River, which has a daily bag limit of 3 trout and each fish must weigh over 1.51b or 0.5kg. The native zebra trout cannot be fished. The Environmental Planning Department wishes to remind fishermen that you need to ask permission before fishing on private land. On the Murrell River, you cannot fish off the culverts or within 100m of the culvert crossing on either side or upstream of Drunken Rock Pass, and these areas are marked. The Falkland Islands is free of all invasive freshwater algae and fish diseases, and we want to keep it that way! So, if you are bringing in fishing gear into the Falkland Islands that has been used elsewhere, you must Check, Clean and Dry. 

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
FORMER Attorney General David Lang received the honour of Companion of the Order of St Michael and St George (CMG) at Government House on Friday.

Mr Lang chose to have the honour bestowed upon him in the Islands rather than by The Queen at Buckingham Palace.

Accepting the CMG, he told a packed reception: "I wanted to receive the insignia in the Falkland Islands because the Falkland Islands are my home and while the award has been for overseas service, in a sense for me it has been for service to the country I love, to the country which is my home."

The CMG was awarded for Mr Lang's long service to the UK's overseas interests, including the 19 years he spent as Attorney General to the Falkland Islands. His nomination was supported by four former Governors of the Falklands.

Mr Lang is believed to be the longest-serving Attorney General in the history of the Overseas Territories. He received the CBE in 1993, particularly for his work in the Turks and Caicos Islands during a period of intense drug crime, when his own life was threatened on several occasions. He has also worked as Attorney

General in the Pacific island of Nauru, and has served the crown for a total of 29 years. Governor Alan Huckle, bestow-

Governor Alan Huckle, bestowing the honour, said of Mr Lang: "His legal knowledge is legendary, his memory phenomenal, and his commitment - reflected in long hours in the office when necessary unquestioned."

Mr Huckle also joked that Mr Lang would only be able to wear one of his two honours around his neck, and suggested that perhaps his wife Theresa could wear the other.

The CMG was created in the 19th Century to reward service in Malta and the Ionian islands. It has since evolved to encompass any members of the diplomatic service and those who render service to UK interests overseas.

Charter flight on the way

Friday, November 2, 2007

COUNCILLORS have given permission for a charter flight to be made to the Falklands from Argentina.

The Austrian Airlines 737-800 is to bring between 40 and 60 Austrian/German passengers to the Islands on November 20 as part of a South American tour originating in Vienna. The visitors are expected to be in the Islands for one day.

This is the first charter flight the Falklands government has allowed to arrive in the Islands from Argentina since 2003, when Argentina refused charters permission to cross its airspace. Councillors say the Falklands' policy has not changed, but that Argentine policy may have.

Speaking on Falkland Islands Radio, Cllr Mike Summers commented: "It's the Argentine policy to deny charter flights to the Falklands, not ours, and if there are people wanting to run tourists to the Falklands using foreign registered aircraft, that's fine by us."

Cllr Janet Robertson agreed. She told *Penguin News*: "It's not an Argentine carrier - we have no reason to object to an Austrian carrier coming here.

"From the information we've had we are confident that it is an ordinary chartered flight - there is nothing in the paperwork to suggest otherwise."

Helicopters for FIGAS?

THE government may include helicopters in its future air service.

Pressure on the aging Islander airframes currently in use increased following the loss of one last year on West Point Island. Whether or not it can be rebuilt is the subject of a report from an inspector from Britten Norman, the aircraft manufacturers.

In addition, rules made by Air Safety Support International which is responsible for the regulation of air services means some airstrips may become unusable by Islanders. As a result, councillors are now looking at the best way to deliver future air services and this, Councillor Mike Summers said, could include a combination of rotary wing and fixed wing aircraft.

The idea of using helicopters is not new, he said. While it could be a more expensive option it would bring the opportunity for significantly more flexibility. "Particularly in support of the tourism industry, helicopters would give the opportunity to go to a lot more locations than it is currently possible to go to," he said.

An open-minded approach is needed to the problem, Cllr Summers said. "We need to think what would provide in the next thirty years or so the best opportunities for serving the existing communities and also expanding tourism and other opportunities around the Falklands."

Wife to wear the trousers at Casa Rosada

ARGENTINA'S current first lady, Cristina Fernandez de Kirchner, has won the country's presidential election.

She will succeed her husband Nestor Kirchner and become Argentina's first female president at an inauguration ceremony on December 10.

Falklands councillors said they expected little change in Argentina's approach to the Islands.

Councillor Mike Summers commented, "Neither Mrs Kirchner nor her supporters has said much at all about her foreign policy plans and objectives in general, never mind in relation to the Falklands. We don't know if she will maintain the same team or whether she'll have a different team or if she'll maintain the same policies or change direction."

He added that from the Argen-



tine perspective, foreign policy objectives in respect of the Falklands under Snr Kirchner have not been conspicuously successful: "It might be time for them to rethink their approach to the Falklands. But whether they will or they won't, we don't know - we'll just have to wait and see."

Penguin News

IT IS with relief that I've noticed the drop over recent years in derogatory references to contract workers living in the Falklands - such bitter talk can create bad feeling throughout the community and is particularly frustrating given that it stemmed from the behaviour of a very small number of individuals.

For a while, we were receiving "contractor bashing" letters every week - you know the kind of thing: "They come here, tell us we're doing it all wrong, change everything for change's sake, get paid twice what we do, then bugger off, leaving us to clear up the mess."

Over the years there may have been one or two people who fitted this description, but it has certainly not been the majority. Most have come to the Islands with a genuine desire to do a good job and explore a country different from their own, and a fair number have become so enamoured with the place they have made it home.

The depth of feeling such people gain for their adopted home was summed up well by the former Attorney General at his investiture (see front page story). He came to the Islands on a contract and now, two decades down the line, calls the Falklands home - he even has three little Falkland Islanders as his grandchildren. Not only was his professional contribution enormous but his family's input to the community will continue far longer.

Not everyone coming to the Falklands will opt to make it their home - but that doesn't mean they can't do a decent job and help the Islands to flourish. It's pleasing the bad feeling has diminished - yes, occasionally we will meet newcomers who seem determined only to change the Falklands to their way but it's important we don't tar everyone with the same brush.

FEW people were surprised by the result of the Argentine election at the weekend and even fewer will have been pleased to hear there is to be a Kirchner in office for another four years.

It's not great news for us: No progress was made in her husband's term of office - in fact relations between the Falklands and Argentina have arguably deteriorated to the worst levels since the cessation of hostilities.

Frustratingly, Cristina's politics remain unclear and we have had little or no public indication of her attitude to the Falklands. But what we do know is that during Nestor's administration, there was almost no decision taken in which his wife did not have a say, so we can safely assume we have another difficult four years ahead.

She may be prettier than her husband (which admittedly isn't difficult) but I don't think we can expect a more attractive relationship with Argentina.

WE'VE attempted a compromise following readers' opinions on the revised TV listings - the schedule now runs from Friday to Friday. To say this should suit everyone is probably inviting trouble so I won't...



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Mixed results shown in WoolCo's first year

THE Falkland Islands Wool Company (WoolCo) has created better incomes for some farmers during its first year, but for others returns dropped.

The company is to reduce the amount of subsidy it requests from the government this year. A previous figure of £135K has been reduced to £105K. A further £25K will be requested for the following year, and the company is then expected to break even without subsidy.

Members of Executive Council last week received a copy of WoolCo's first year review. It reports that farmers who benefited most from joining were those who previously sold through agents, or who were selling mid-micron wools. Farmers who had always sold their own wool (and so never paid commission), and those selling finer wools tended to be worse off.

It said many of the company's first year goals were reached. It had found new clients in India, Australia, Germany and the UK, and had continued to sell to existing top-makers. It exceeded its target of selling 50 per cent of the wool clip, hitting 51.2 per cent.

However, it had failed to improve cash flow to farmers, and had not completed its target of using the internet to sell wool.

Nigel Knight's Coast Ridge Farm was listed in the report as a business which has benefited from joining WoolCo. It estimated that he received £2,300 more for his clip of 15,500 kilos (clean), regardless of the movement of underlying prices. Mr Knight, who is a member

Mr Knight, who is a member of the company's board, said: "We've had our problems, but the good thing about it is the process. The bids you're offered are what we call net Stanley prices - that is, the price of the wool at FIPASS - so you know exactly what you are going to get. Before, we'd be offered a gross price and everything like freight had to come off afterwards, so you didn't actually know how much you were going to end up with."

He added: "I can recommend it to anybody - I'm convinced it's the way forward for farmers. It gives farmers more control."

Income for Falkland Landholdings (FLH), which makes up 60 per cent of the clip sold by WoolCo, was reported to be down one hundredth of a penny per kilo, but this amounted to £3,500 for the whole clip.

However, FLH General Manager, Owen Summers, said more wool had been sold since the report was written: "At the end of the day we've come out about even. We probably did better ourselves on marketing, but shipping and other things that we've saved on this year have brought us back up."

WoolCo's managing director, David Lambert, is expected to move to a consultancy role in January 2008, leaving manager Rodney Lee to run the company on the ground.

Loligo licences go up again

FISHING companies are disappointed that the government has once again increased licence fees for loligo squid and some finfish.

The increases were announced by Executive Council this week.

The news follows changes to the way fees are charged. Under the Fisheries Ordinance of 2005, provision is made for charging for access to the fishery on the basis of quota ownership.

Fishing rights will now be based on a company quota system rather than being charged as vessel specific licences.

ExCo spokesperson, Councillor Andrea Clausen said the move to charging for quota was part of an ongoing process and previously only the toothfish fishery was charged on a quota ownership basis: "As part of this process members considered a paper outlining annual quota charges for the loligo and finfish fisheries for 2008."

The paper put to Executive Council proposed an increase in loligo charges of 20 per cent, reflecting a desire to bring the fee/ revenue ratio up to 10 per cent from 7.7 per cent. However Cllr Clausen said that given the consistent escalation in fuel prices, she and her colleagues decided on an increase of 10 per cent, which brings the fee/revenue ratio to 8.48 per cent.

She commented: "If the fee/ revenue ratio does not come back up to 10 per cent when quota fees are next considered then further adjustments can be made if necessary."

Drew Irvine, Chairman of the newly established Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association (see opposite), said the organisation was disappointed that licence fees for some finfish fisheries and loligo had been increased.

He commented: "Although illex licence fees have not increased there is an argument to cut these to ease the current market conditions.

"The current FIG licence fee take is already one of the highest in global fishery terms and fee revenue calculations ignore vessel operational costs, escalating fuel prices and other benefits to the economy through taxation."

British Ambassador to Chile to visit

THE British Ambassador to Chile is to visit the Islands later this month. Howard Drake arrives on November 17 to see the Islands first hand.

Councillor Mike Summers commented: "Like all other British South American ambassadors, he has to deal with the Falklands/Argentine issue on a regular basis."

While he is here, councillors intend to discuss the idea of having a Chilean consul in the Islands. Mr Summers said there was general support among councillors for the idea: "It arose out of some employment difficulties that some Chileans have had and they perhaps felt a little exposed in not having any sort of representative."

Falklands stamps on show in UK

AN EXHIBITION showing the postal history of the Falkland Islands has been on display at Spink. leading auctioneers of coins, stamps, medals and banknotes, in London.

The exhibition, put together by the members of the Falkland Islands Philatelic Study Group, was officially opened on Tuesday by former Governor and Chairman of the Falkland Islands Association, David Tatham CMG.

It featured items from the earliest postal history of the Islands up until the Argentine invasion in 1982. Information from the Philatelie Bureau in Stanley on some of the more recent stamp issues, are available for visitors to take away, along with general information about the Islands.

The Falkland Islands Government's representative in the UK, Sukey Cameron, said the idea for the exhibition came about from discussions between her and Suresh Dhargalkar LVO, formerly the Deputy Keeper of the Royal Philatelic Collection. She said: "After an initial meeting with Spink they kindly agreed to host the exhibition in their recently renovated gallery and organise the opening event."

The exhibition ran all week, and closes today.

This week's cruise visitors

THREE cruise ships will visit the Falklands this week. Professor *Multanovskiv* (with 52 passengers) will be in Stanley tomorrow and head to Sea Lion Island on Sunday.

Polar Star (100) will visit New Island and West Point on Monday then head to Stanley on Tuesday.

New era for the fishing industry

A NEW alliance of fishing companies has been established in the Islands.

The Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association (FIFCA) held its inaugural annual general meeting on Tuesday evening, at which it adopted its Constitution and appointed members of the board.

At a dinner held to celebrate the occasion, chairman Drew Irvine said FIFCA was the first association which was truly representative of the fishing industry as a whole.

He said it was part of the radical overhaul of fisheries policy that started in 2002 and is still a work in progress: "This has changed the vessel-based, short term licensing into a companybased long term quota system. This change has altered the fundamental dynamics of the industry."

"The long term security in particular will lead to greater efficiency and prosperity for the industry and the Falklands as a whole. This is an important step as it will continue to provide the basis for the financial security of the Islands for the foresceable future," he added.

Shifting the competition for licences from government policy to

the market place has also made it easier for the industry to work together, Mr Irvine said, and this will make the association a much more effective organisation.

Fisheries portfolio holder Councillor Andrea Clausen congratulated the industry on the establishment of FIFCA.

She commented: "You will have four new members who will sit on the Fisheries Advisory Committee and I and my colleagues look forward to our discussions and deliberation and working together with the new association."

'Government can't be bound by Chamber economy report'

COUNCILLORS have welcomed the commission by the Chamber of Commerce of a report into the economy but say they will not be bound by it.

As reported by *Penguin News* last week, the Chamber has commissioned former Economic Advisor Dr Mike Harte to write an independent review of the government's handling of the economy. Representatives of the chamber recently met with councillors to discuss the report.

Councillor Mike Summers said he and his colleagues had been happy to listen to the Chamber's view on the economy but had to ensure they were working with up to date financial information: "It is important that it's based on current information - much of the discussion we had with the Chamber was to do with whether the information their consultant was using was fully up to date and whether the sorts of conclusion that Dr Harte might draw would be supported by the current facts and figures."

He said the government was not bound by the report and the Chamber of Commerce had a view about a particular part of the community - the business sector - whereas councillors had to look at a bigger picture: "They don't necessarily have a view about social policy, cultural policy, wealth distribution or those sorts of things that form part of the wider thinking of the government. But it is right that all sectors of society should provide their opinions - we welcome the participation of the Chamber of Commerce in these sorts of discussions.

Constitution talks: 'FCO aren't holding a vox pop'

REPRESENTATIVES of the Foreign Office will visit the Islands next month to discuss the report of the Select Committee on the Constitution. While members of the public will be able to speak directly to the visitors, they will probably not hold a public meeting while they are here.

Cllr Summers says the delegation is not coming to conduct public surveys: "The Select Committee has spent a lot of time asking the public what it thought about the various elements of the proposals to amend the constitution and the results are reflected in the Select Committee document, so it would not be for the FCO to conduct its own vox pop - although they may be made available to members of the public somehow."

He added, "If members of the public want to speak directly to them they can, but any lobbying that anyone might like to do - in terms of what should or shouldn't be contained in the report of the Select Committee - should be aimed at the Select Committee and not at somebody else.

"For the FCO to be selectively lobbied by individuals would be inappropriate."

How many green bottles sitting on the wall?

THE Faikland Islands consume 62,500 bottles of beer every month, and over 10,000 bottles of wine, it has been estimated.

The figures were gathered from alcohol vendors in the Islands to aid the move to glass recycling. Around 210 tonnes of glass are dumped every year, and at present rates of recycling, 39 tonnes of that will be turned into reusable cullet. The Public Works committee heard on Wednesday that members of the public had embraced recycling, but few pubs were taking part.

Members said the relatively low cost of commercial waste disposal -£280 a year per bin – meant that it was not economically viable for most businesses to spend time recycling. Councillor Andrea Clausen suggested that some kind of incentive

scheme could be considered to encourage bars to recycle.

The cullet has so far been used by Stanley Dairy in "heat sinks" in its cowsheds.

There are also hopes that it could be used as an arts and crafts material for children from the community school to create murals and mosaics.

News from Executive Council Councillor Andrea Clausen reports on the October meeting Non-Falklands ship listings under review

THE criteria for listing non-Falklands flagged vessels is to be reviewed.

Listing allows the veterinary section to inspect transhipments and cargo consignments to see if they satisfy the standards for export to the EU.

An application was made to the Falkland Islands Government for the listing of three non-Falkland Islands-flagged vessels under the Fisheries Products Ordinance 1998. ExCo asked that a definition of "close economic connection", as required under the Ordinance, be provided, so that any applicants can be assessed against transparent and objective criteria.

Councillor Clausen said ExCo approved the criteria set down by the Director of Fisheries, that requests to be listed are likely to be considered favourably if the application is submitted by a company owning ITQ or PQ in the Falkland Islands, if there is a close connection between the vessels and that company, and if there is significant economic benefit for the Falkland Islands.

"Requests from Falklands companies which do not own quota will be considered on their merits," she added.

Requests will be considered by

the Fisheries Committee (with input from the veterinary section) with a recommendation going to ExCo for the final decision.

Cllr Clausen said listing will be on the basis of the government achieving full cost recovery and added: "It will only occur with the support of the flag state and the Falkland Islands company applying would need to have sufficient control to ensure compliance with the Fisheries Products Ordinance

'Council further stated that listing in this manner does not provide any non-Falkland Island flagged vessel access to EU quota and that listing be time limited for 12 months so that a review of the close economic connection can be made to ensure it has not been degraded.

Ship identification

The issue of introducing the Automatic Identification System (AIS) to all vessels licensed for the Falkland Islands fishery was first considered by ExCo in August 2007. Councillors were not content that the issue of how the AIS units could be supplied had been fully explored and so asked for further information.

Cllr Clausen reported: "Council now note that the supply and installation of AIS units can be made using the private sector and approved that the deadline for making the carriage of Class 'A AIS units mandatory for fishing vessels licensed for Falkland Islands conservation zones, be set as 1 July 2008.'

Ímperial contract

For the past twenty years the Falkland Islands government has contracted fisheries management advice from Imperial College but this is now set to change.

Following a decision to localise this area of work, the contract advice has been reduced over the past five years and the fisheries department has recruited qualified staff to allow the transfer of this work to the Falklands.

Cllr Clausen said ExCo agreed that a further contract would be entered into with Imperial College for three years to provide advice in three core areas: "These will include transition support for the new ITQ system, stock assessment advice and quota fee advice - this advice is in terms of an alternate opinion for the latter two areas

"Costs will start at £73,473 in year one and reduce to £60,402 in year three," she added.

How well is FLH progressing?

THE progress of Falkland Landholdings (FLH) over the past twelve months has been under review

Cllr Clausen said many of the objectives laid down in the FLH Recovery Plan have some way to go before they are met, however there has been some significant progress. She commented: "The average micron has improved by around 0.5 micron per annum over the past three years and wool income is improving and remains close to that budgeted."

However she added that ExCo. had requested that budget projections be reviewed as there were some consistent discrepancies between budget and actual figures.

They further requested that, given low levels of subsidy required in future years, the board of FLH should consider whether or not the use of an overdraft facility in order to cushion deficits would be appropriate.

To ban or not to ban...

THE report of the Working Group on the possible prohibition of smoking in public places is to be re-drafted and then released for public consultation

Cllr Clausen - who chairs the group - said that there are still a number of areas that remain to be resolved, so ExCo requested that the paper be re-drafted to provide clear options in each area.

The paper will then be referred to the Chief Police Officer so that consideration of practical issues relating to enforcement can be provided.

"Following a period of public consultation on the final report Council will then provide direction," she said.

FITB gets funding for boss

FUNDING has been granted for the new tourism boss's job.

The final budget provided to the Falkland Islands Tourist Board following Budget Select Committee did not include funding for the employment and relocation of a General Manager.

Having successfully completed the recruitment process the new General Manager, Jake Downing arrives in the Islands tomorrow - the Tourist Board has now been approved funding for the costs associated with recruitment and employment for two years.

More paid days for councillors

COUNCILLORS have increased the number of days for which they can claim pay

Under the Elected Councillors Allowances Ordinance, elected members are entitled to claim for 36 portfolio days per annum, although during the budget process in 2002 councillors decided to claim only 24 days per annum, a practice that continues today.

Rather than pursue the issue of full time pay for members during the current term of office. ExCo approved the request to increase the number of claimable portfolio days to 60 per annum. Cllr Clausen explained: "This is to take into account the increased workload when the revised portfolio structure is introduced in November 2007."

The new portfolio structure was discussed by General Purposes Committee last week. Cllr Summers commented: "Some members wondered whether, since we were no longer going to be opting for full time councillors, it remained appropriate to introduce the new portfolio system."

No conclusion was reached on this and it will be further discussed on November 20.

Tourist medical insurance: 'a clear policy is needed'



A STRATEGY for medical insurance for visitors to the Falklands has been examined by ExCo.

It came about as a result of a number of difficulties encountered by Customs and Immigration staff, inconsistent travel advice and an unclear policy on the provision of medical treatment regarding travel/medical insurance for visitors.

Cllr Clausen said ExCo requested that the requirement for travel/medical insurance remain but indicated that Customs and Immigration officers should not provide a checking service or advice on individual policies. She

commented: "Council approved that the recommended minimum limit for the medical insurance component include medical treatment, aeromed to a third country and repatriation costs, at US\$200,000; that a letter be issued to cruise company agents and other tour operators regarding travel/medical insurance and that a consistent message and wording about travel/medical insurance is in the public domain."

ExCo also requested that the procedure for handling sick/injured visitors be considered further by the Attorney General and the Chief Executive.

FIC plans extension - and more demolition

THE Falkland Islands Company (FIC) has applied for permission to continue demolition and to build an extension behind the West Store.

As reported in *PN* last week, FIC recently demolished the former JM Dean & Sons smithy without planning permission. It now wants to knock down the rest of the Basics building, which incorporates Deans' former sail loft

The supermarket's main entrance would be moved to the south side, and the car park to the rear of the development would become the main shoppers' parking area. FIC Director Roger Spink said:

FIC Director Roger Spink said: "The plans are to improve customer access to the store, and are a major move to improve the appearance and parking in central Stanley, together with better disabled access. It will also provide more space to improve the range of goods available to customers."

Regarding the proposed demolition, he commented: "The Basics building and what has been left of it has been extensively altered over the years, as can be seen by the plastic cladding, is rotting in parts and is not suited to a modern retail environment."

As a general rule, buildings which would require planning permission to be put up also need permission to be demolished. This includes commercial buildings in Stanley. The power of the government to punish those who don't comply is variable. Environmental Planning Officer Andrea Wright said the Planning and Building Committee could issue an enforcement order outlining what steps should be taken to remedy the breach of planning law. On one previous occasion this has included the reconstruction of a building which was knocked down without permission.

It is unlikely this could be done in the case of the smithy, because FIC had received incorrect advice from the government stating that permission was not needed.

However, it also emerged this week that FIC had been denied permission to build an extension on the site of the building (also known as the Old Bakery) in 2002. At that time the company was told that the reason for the rejection was: "The demolition of the 'Old Bakery' would result in the loss of a building of significant heritage value.""

At last week's General Purposes Committee (GPC), members agreed that they would ask Ms Wright to

lay out for them the details of how a conservation area could be introduced in Stanley.

Conservation areas are generally used to impose stricter planning controls in order to preserve the historic character of an area. The Stanley Town Plan includes a suggested outline for a conservation area, but there is currently no legislation in place that would make it enforceable.

Councillor Mike Summers said that concerns had been expressed at GPC about the complexity of creating a conservation area, and the difficulties it might cause for residents: "The whole idea of coming up with a set of criteria for the regulation of a conservation area sounds very complicated. So we need to think about whether we can consider particular smaller areas of central Stanley or whether we should be considering particular types of buildings."

Town Hall lift would cost £88K

THE installation of a lift in the Town Hall would cost £88,300, according to figures submitted to the Public Works committee on Wednesday.

Members agreed that, although a lift would offer clear benefits in terms of disabled access, the price tag was too high.

Their comments will be forwarded to the government's capital programme review group for a final decision.

• THE ban on smoking in the Town Hall has brought an unexpected cash bonus for government. Ventilation which was to be installed in the hall is no longer needed because of the ban.

News exhibition

HIGHLIGHTS of UK media coverage of the Falklands from the past 12 months will be on display at Standard Chartered Bank from Monday.

Over 170 articles about life in the Falklands have appeared in the past year, buoyed by interest in the 25th anniversary of the conflict. These have included items in the *Independent*, *Guardian*, *Financial Times* and *Times* newspapers.

The exhibition, organised by the government's PR agency, Keene, runs until November 16 in the foyer of the bank.

Wind farm generates excitement as its power keeps growing

STANLEY has been running on up to 25 per cent renewable energy when the windfarm is running at its best.

Director of Public Works. Manfred Keenleyside, told the Public Works committee on Wednesday that the farm was still operating on its lower, "fuel saver" mode, but settings had been gradually increased each week.

The turbines' contribution to

Stanley's electricity requirement is typically around 20 to 25 per cent during the day, and at night 15 to 18 per cent - although this can drop to zero at very calm times, when the slack is taken up by diesel.

Over 300.000 units of electricity have so far been generated by the turbines.

Councillor Richard Cockwell commented: "We have an extremely good news story here."





FIC were asked twice to list historic building

IN THE article on the demolition of Dean's Smithy in last week's Penguin News, Roger Spink is quoted as asking "If it was such a historic building, why in the last 10 years has no one approached us to have it listed ?

The Historic Buildings Committee has twice requested listing for this building. The first time was in 1991, when a recommendation for listing was endorsed by the Planning and Building Committee, but not approved by Executive Council. The second time was in 1995 when the Falkland Islands Company were approached directly by the Historic Buildings Committee to ask if they would consent to the building being listed. They responded that they had development plans for the area and did not want to be restricted. As Executive Council had a policy of not listing without owner consent, no further action could be taken.

In 2002 the FIC submitted two planning applications for new development on the site, one of which involved demolition of the Smithy, or Old Bakery as it was also known, because the Company had established a bakery there in 1901. This application was refused by the Planning and Building Committee on the grounds that "The demolition of the 'Old Bakery' would re-

sult in the loss of a building of sig-nificant heritage value." The FIC then implemented an alternative plan by which an extension to the West Store was constructed with one end against the north face of the Smithy. Although this sadly obscured an attractive building, no demolition was involved and it was hoped that the FIC might still be able to make use of what might prove an asset in an expanding tourist market.

As was pointed out in last week's editorial, there are numerous examples worldwide of successful commercial development in areas where the built heritage has been preserved. This is particularly noticeable in places with a thriving tourist industry

The Historic Buildings Committee are anxious to work with owners to help maintain important old buildings and ensure they do not become damp and dilapidated, but can be used to advantage. They particularly look forward to working with local businesses to capitalise on these potential assets.

Our built heritage is a crucial part of our identity and we need to care for it and make use of it in presenting the Falkland Islands to the world.

In it we have only used material which we believe is verifiable as fact with suitable references appended.


Given the information we have it has not been possible for us to include all the possible origins of Falkland Islanders as we do not have the necessary verifiable references.

'Who are you calling Big Nose?'

Italian elephant seal scientists mark twelve years of research in the Falklands

TWO Italian scientists are celebrating 12 years of continuous research of the elephant seals on Sea Lion Island.

In 1995 doctors Filippo Galimberti and Simona Sanvito, of the Elephant Seal Research Group (ESRG) embarked on their research to study the population dynamics, the breeding strategies, and life histories of male and female elephant seals breeding on Sea Lion Island.

The island is home to one of the largest breeding populations of elephant seals in the Falkland Islands, with about 550 breeding females usually hauled ashore to pup between September and November. The current location of breeding populations of elephant seals in the Falkland Islands is not well known and FIG's Environmental Planning Department will be running a questionnaire-based survey during late November asking farmers and landowners to count the number of weaned elephant seal pups. Landowners should have received questionnaires via October's Wool Press but publicity will occur during early November.

Although the questionnaire will tell the researcher if the range and size of the Falklands elephant seal population has increased, it only represents a very small fraction of the world's population. But by taking a tiny piece of skin from the Sea Lion Island elephant seals and analysing the genetic signature, ESRG has determined that the elephant seals on the island do not interbreed very often with individuals from Argentina or South Georgia. "The Falklands elephant seals are always going to be nationally important. historically it was for the sealers, and now they are recognized for their role within the Falklands oceanic ecosystem, and for wildlife tourism," explained Dr Galimberti. "Small populations are also vulnerable to catastrophic events such as oil pollution or a disease, and this makes protecting elephant seals even more of a challenge."

According to the Environmental Planning Department which is called on to provide advice to the fishing, oil and tourism operators about how these industries can avoid negatively impacting on marine wildlife, data provided by ESRG is critical.

Environmental Officer Helen Otley explained: "Snapshot surveys are great but knowing how the wildlife changes over time and with different land and sea conditions is critical for effective long-term conservation planning.

"It is difficult for local or international scientists to maintain science programmes both logistically and financially in the Falkland Islands and to their credit, and with little government support, Filippo and Simona have marked about 9200 elephant seals, following many of them for their whole life span."

Dr Galimberti and Dr Sanvito and their field assistants live on Sea Lion Island from September until November each year in one of the small cabins at Sea Lion Lodge. For the rest of the year, they travel to a lab where they process their samples and data, as well as conducting a similar, parallel study of the northern elephant seal on an island off Baja California, Mexico.

Seven Italian scientists have completed their graduate studies as part of the research programme and almost 30 scientific papers have been published, and are therefore available to scientists worldwide.

One feature that particularly puzzled Dr Sanvito when she first started working on Sea Lion Island was the huge fleshy trunk that extends from the nose of male elephant seals.

Simona said: "Imagine Sea Lion Island, September, a clear and cold morning: a wild gurgling powerful sound comes from the beaches. Two male elephant seals are facing each other, vocalizing with their mouths wide open and their huge proboscis stiffened, ready to fight to gain access to the females that recently arrived to the island to give birth to their pups. One of them will become the harcm holder, getting control of up to more than 100 females later in the season."

Drs Galimberti and Sanvito wondered if the stiff schnozzle, which can reach almost 50 cm long in big males, was a visible signal of breeding status, a sounding box for roaring males or simply a cue for female choice, like the colourful plumage of certain bird species. But how could they study the probosets of a 3,000kg wild and dangerous animal? Dr Sanvito explained "By trial and error, we found that photography was the safest and least disturbing method."

But the key to solving the puzzle was the long-term nature of the research – a photo could be taken each year of tagged males from when they were young.

"We discovered that the size of this huge nose is a rough index of the individual age and size of male elephant seals, with older and bigger males having bigger noses and the bigger the nose, the higher chance of being a dominant male." Dr Sanvito explained.

"It seems that the advantage of having such a big nose is related to the emission of males aggressive vocalization, with the proboscis acting as a secondary resonator, and elongating the vocal tract. By using the proboscis males emit frequencies that are lower than the expected from their body size. Therefore, they can somehow exaggerate their size in the information provided by their vocalization to competing males." So sometimes having a big nose does help!

Port report held up

THE publication of the report commissioned to look at port facilities in Stanley has been delayed, despite assurances from General Manager of FIDC last month that it was imminent.

Mark Brunet had intended to issue the Royal Haskoning report last Friday, together with a report setting it in the wider context of the debate on port location

the debate on port location. However, he said on Friday that more time was needed: "The Haskoning report has been subject to consultation for factual verification over the past couple of months, and we are grateful for the feedback we have had on the background sections.

"However, reading the current draft of the Haskoning report earlier this week, it became apparent that the final section showing indicative costings for various scenarios is in need of re-drafting to provide greater clarity. The final proofing exercise has also shown a couple of errors which still need correcting."

Mr Brunet said the report would be resubmitted by Royal Haskoning on November 5 and the final version released on November 7.

Travel in style on the airbridge - but it'll cost you £3K

PREMIUM economy seats on the airbridge will cost £3,091, it has been announced.

The seats, which were previously allocated only by the military, are being offered for sale for the first time as part of a move towards a more commercial operation of the Ministry of Defence flight. They have more space, recline for sleeping, and offer better food and wine at meal times.

The seats will only be available when there is space within the civilian allocation on the flight. They will be sold on a first

come, first served basis, and can be booked in the same way as regular airbridge tickets - through the Falkland Islands Company and the Falkland Islands Government Office in London.

Singles are also available, at a cost of £1,550.



Open verdict on missing sailor *Indom* crewman probably slipped from quayside

A SAILOR who went missing at Mare Harbour two years ago probably tripped and fell between his ship and the dockside as he returned from the pub, an inquest has heard.

Second Engineer Anthony McClelland, who was 36, was last seen by friends in the Harbour Lights bar late on Friday, November 25, 2005. He told them he would finish his last drink and return to his ship, MV Indomitable.

However, the following morning, friends discovered he was missing and raised the alarm, sparking a huge search operation. Coroner Alison Thompson

Coroner Alison Thompson heard in court last Friday that a local dive team had searched the quayside, a helicopter was dispatched, and extensive sea and land searches were carried out in an effort to find Mr McClelland.

The hunt continued until December 12, when a foot search of the entire coastline around Mare Harbour failed to find any sign of the missing man, and efforts were finally called off. His body was never found.

Miss Thompson visited Mare Harbour last Tuesday to see for herself the area where Mr McClelland was last seen alive. She heard in court that, according



to his friends and colleagues, he had not appeared particularly drunk on the evening of his disappearance.

Inspector Len McGill told the court the crew were supposed to board the ship via the gangplank, but he had visited Marc Harbour in the course of his investigations and had seen sailors jump directly from shore to ship.

He said it was reasonable to suppose that Mr McClelland may have tried to do the same as he returned from the bar. However,

there was a particularly large gap – up to a metre and a half – between the shore and the side of the vessel that night.

On the day of his disappearance, Mr McClelland, who was from the Walton area of Liverpool, had spoken to his girlfriend by phone and was looking forward to seeing his young son during a period of leave in December.

Ms Thompson asked Insp McGill whether his investigations had uncovered any hint of foul play, or whether he thought he could have taken his own life. He replied: "Nothing came to light at all during any of the investigations or interviews. He appeared to be a well-liked man who, whilst not putting himself forward, was part of a team and quite well-balanced in his life."

He added: "I believe that he fell between his vessel and the quayside that it was moored to that evening and perished as a result."

Ms Thompson agreed: "It is quite right that accidental tripping or falling has to be a front runner in a list of possibilities."

However, she was unable to record a verdict of accidental death because she could not rule out the possibility that he had suffered a health problem such as cardiac failure, which had led to a fall.

She therefore recorded an open verdict, ruling out both foul play and suicide.

Insp McGill and Miss Thompson offered their thanks to the large number of people who had been involved in the search for Mr McClelland.

Insp McGill said of its scale: "It is a mark of the respect that they had for him but also of the shock that the community felt at Mount Pleasant that one of their own had gone missing."

19th century triplets

WE asked last week if any of our readers knew whether the triplets born to Una McKay and her partner David Ward were the first in Falklands history.

Ann Reid of the Falkland Islands Family History Society tells us they are not.

A set of triplets was born in Stanley on 27 July, 1879 to Arthur Bishop and Hannah Jacobs, both originally from England.

Sadly two of the babies died just 15 minutes after birth, and no names are recorded for them.

The surviving child, Alfred Stanley Bishop, went on to marry Ada Mabel Alazia in South America, and they had a son, Ernesto Bishop Alazia, who was born in Punta Arenas in 1913.

The triplets' mother, who already had a daughter before her multiple birth, went on to have a further three children, and the family eventually emigrated to Rio Gallegos in Argentina. Hannah died in Punta Arenas, Chile, in 1927 at the ripe old age of 90.

Ann has gathered the information as part of a project to compile records of Falklands births, deaths and marriages onto a CDRom.

Sheila Ford: 1926 - 2007

IT IS with regret we report the death in Glossop, Derbyshire on October 18 of Sheila Ford after a long illness.

Sheila was born on May 28, 1926, the eldest of four daughters to Kit and Bert Sedgewick of Stanley. She will be remembered by many of the older folk as the first May Queen at the annual May Ball when they were started in their present format after WWII, winning the title in 1949 and 1950. She worked for some time in the millinery department of the old Globe Store and was active, along with Nora Harries, in the organisation of the Life Boys during their early years.

She met the late Jack Ford, a member of the Falkland Islands Dependency Survey (now BAS), on one of his stopovers en route to the Antarctic bases and they were married in Ashton under Lyne, England on 7 July, 1953.

The call south proved too strong to resist however and they returned to spend three years at Grytviken, South Georgia where Jack was one of the weathermen.



They headed back to England where their daughter Jacqueline was born in Ashford, Kent in 1961.

Following that they returned to the Falklands for another term, then to Belguim, eventually retiring to Glossop in the late 1970s.

Sheila is survived by her daughter Jacqueline, granddaughters Emily (19) and Elouise (15) and sisters Doreen, Phyllis and Valerie.


'Dolly Penguin' 1924 - 2007

Gypsy Cove: caring for a site everyone can enjoy

A NEW viewing platform has been built at Gypsy Cove, ready for the throngs of tourists who will visit the area this summer.

The construction - the third platform to be built at the wildlife site - is a part of the Gypsy Cove management plan which the government recently adopted. The plan has three specific aims - to maintain and, where possible, enhance the wildlife, to ensure visitors to Gypsy Cove stay safe and to educate visitors to the area.

Gypsy Cove is the one wildlife site tourists to Stanley can visit free of charge, said the government's Environmental Officer, Helen Otley, and infrastructure, such as the viewing platforms is vital for the protection of the area.

She explained: "We don't want to stop people from visiting Gypsy Cove but these physical features can prevent damage happening as a result. We need to have a more controlled environment or we will ruin it."

Helen acknowledged that local people may be concerned about the amount of infrastructure being built at Gypsy Cove but said it was necessary: "If we don't have it, it could get trashed to the extent that no one will want to go there."

Whether or not further investment should be made in the area is the subject of a questionnaire being released by the Environmental

Planning Department this week respondents will be asked to rate what they see as the priorities for the area, such as improvements to the track to Gypsy Cove, expansion of the car park and better toilet facilities.

The views of the public will help identify what funding will be needed next year, Helen said: "At the moment the track to Gypsy Cove is not maintained because there is no budget for it. Unless the community wants it maintained, the government will never find funding for it. We want to know what the community perceives as the most critical infrastructure issues."

Questionnaires can be re-

quested from the Environmental Planning Department - Fiona Wallace-Nannig is the co-ordinator for the work at Gypsy Cove.



Penguin News, November 2, 2007

Last week WO2 Steve Tooby, instructor to the Falkland Islands Defence Force, told us how the FIDF reached South Georgia as part of a joint sea, air and land operation. Here he concludes his account of the trip with the scaling of Mount Hodges.

THE morning of October 5 did not have the ideal weather conditions to start attempting the summit of Mount Hodges: The cloud cover was low with visibility only 10 metres at times.

The snow was still wet and warm and as we broke camp and traversed from Gull Lake to the initial training area 30 minutes up towards the hut at Hodges, it became painfully obvious that today was going to be a long and physically hard day. We were often sinking, even

We were often sinking, even with snowshoes on, up to 12 inches. We took heart in the fact that everyone's spirits were high, and there was every chance the winds would pick up and dislodge the clouds as the day progressed. The first instructional climb-

The first instructional climbing area saw us initially cracking the art form of ice axe arrest.

Climbers must master arresting before ascending any mountainous feature. The reason for many mountaineering deaths is the inability to stop yourself once you are dislodged from the mountain and start sliding, often to a sheer cliff wall or into crevasses or rock bands, causing injury and sometimes, God forbid, death.

Ice axe arrest is also extremely good fun - everyone just loves rolling around in the snow at great speeds.

We moved onto ice axe and crampon technique for ascending a slope, and culminated the morning's training with a couple of pitched and mixed snow and rock climbs. This was great for teamwork, as we were roped in teams of two or four. A fall by any team members may multiply: when momentum is gained the other team members would also be dislodged and dragged down the mountain.

This is a mountaineer's worst nightmare as the sheer gravitational pull and force generated by a falling lead climber is potentially deadly.

The last activity (as if we hadn't done enough dangerous stuff!) was for each buddy-buddy pairing to establish a rope belay, then precariously move to the edge of a sheer face cliff.

Could you stand delicately at the edge of the overhanging cornice and jump? I don't see it as jumping, I see it as a "leap of faith": the faith in one's partner to hold that fall as you dangle swinging or bouncing below. This is teamwork at its best, and the confidence gained by both parties in each other after these stunts is invaluable.

The training finished, we set off up the mountain, very slowly as we sank deeper in the soft wet snow with each step. I really thought the snow would harden off the higher we climbed, but that was not the case. The wind had not yet come to our aid, the cloud cover made navigation extremely difficult and without Maj Biggs, who had once lived in South Georgia, we would not have got anywhere. The fact Peter as a youth had regularly played here - this was his back garden as a child was invaluable.

Eventually we came upon the now disused hut close to the Hodges Glacier. The cloud cover was still thick so we gave ourselves a 30 minute break to make drinks and have a late lunch.

The light was fading fast and although we had made great progress, we were moving slowly. It was 1500hrs, we had left base camp at 0800hrs, we had little water left and needed to melt more snow to replenish our already dehydrated bodies. As if we were in touch with The Almighty himself, the clouds cleared, briefly bringing the summit into view.

We were so close, so with confidence boosted and morale soar-

ing we set off to crack the top. Still sinking in the snow, my legs cramping with each kick, we mounted the ridge 200ft below the summit. One hour had passed and we had only covered about 330ft.

The weather was now bucketing horizontal rain on our faces, we slowly pressed on to the summit, eventually topping out at 1715hrs. We held a quick photo shoot - not that you could see much - and began our descent.

Descending is the most dangerous of times in climbing. When you have summited people become careless and this is when you are at your most vulnerable.

Jay Moffat did a fantastic job of leading my four man team down. I was extremely conscious of the fact that all apart from Jaqueline Bennebroek (Doc), and Maj Biggs on the other rope were total novices, however the professionalism and determination shown by all the members was inspiring. I was quickly made to feel totally at ease by the team's skill and discipline and they looked like they had been mountaineering for a lifetime.

Once the bolts of lightning started to bounce around us some 50 metres from the summit it became apparent to everyone that the dangers at altitude are everywhere and you can be forever vigilant and sharp but still become a victim, Luckily this was not to be on this occasion.

The seven members of the FIDF had in the space of one week learned several new skills, and they had applied these skills in an unknown and potentially dangerous theatre of operation. They had bonded as a mixed group of different personalities from a wide assortment of professions.

The ease with which they had acquired the knowledge and skills taught them shows the Falkland Islands Defence Force are truly an effective force for all areas in the South Atlantic.

We must remember we were a small part of the bigger picture and that the whole element who travelled to South Georgia had achieved all the goals set by the Commander of British Forces, South Atlantic.

We, the FIDF, felt that by summiting Hodges we had proven that a force of total novices, with the right training, dedication and determination could land at South Georgia and project a force in whatever capacity, even under adverse conditions.

To be part of, plan and execute the first "Out of Area Operation" for the FIDF was a proud moment within my career and I feel all Islanders should feel a sense of pride in the overall capabilities of your Defence Force.

Q HOW many people who are eligible for personal taxation in the Falklands (whether or not their income puts them above the threshold) are also on the electoral roll?

A Taxation Officer Tanya Lee answered this question.

During 2006 there were a total of 2.703 individuals subject to Falkland Islands Tax. 1,273 of those people are not on the Electoral Register. However, those figures do not represent the number of contract workers/work permit holders in the Falkland Islands during 2006 at any one time. There are many other classes of individuals included in those figures such as:

• Individuals under the age of 18 working full or part time do not qualify to be included on the Electoral Register.

· Off shore workers.

• Where a contract officer has been replaced by another, both were subject to Falkland Islands tax during that year and so both are included in those figures.

• Of the 2,703 subject to Falkland Island tax, not all will be paying tax as they are under the personal allowance, or not working at all. Individuals living overseas but receiving rental income or a pension from the Falkland Islands are subject to Falkland Islands tax on those sources of income, but do not qualify to be included on the Electoral Register.

Q DO the military use depleted uranium in their ammunition in the Falkland Islands? If so, have any studies been done into the effect of this on the water table?

How does the MoD dispose of radioactive waste from the Falkland Islands (e.g. from sight systems)?

A Media Ops officer, Flt Lt Wayne Jones, supplied this response

I can confirm that depleted uranium is not used in the Falkland Islands by the British military.

tary. We do use some low level radioactive items. In terms of disposal, any damaged or non-required items are signed off by a Radiation Protection Supervisor and these items are then returned to UK with the correct paperwork for disposal by the appropriate authority.

Q HOW much revenue do we receive from ship passengers/ crew per annum?

How much revenue comes specifically from deportation and arrival taxes.

Does this revenue go back into tourism? If not, where does it go?

A Financial Secretary Derek Howatt answered this series of questions

In the current financial year (2007/08) it is estimated that revenue of £723,350 will be received from the (ship) Passenger Levy which is the only form of passenger arrival tax levied.

Ships are also subject to customs services fees and harbour dues and revenue from this source is estimated at $\pounds1,245,590$ for 2007/08.

There is no deportation tax as such but Embarkation Tax (payable by passengers on outward international flights) is estimated to raise £132,000 in 2007/08.

All these revenues are required


to be paid by law to the Consolidated Fund and their application, along with all the other estimated revenues, is determined in the annual budget process.

Q DO any members of PWD staff provide upkeep for the Argentine cemetery at Darwin? Are any of these employces, or anyone else, also paid privately by parties in Argentina to carry out maintenance on the cemetery?

A Manfred Keenleyside, Director of Public Works replied:

As far as I am aware, an individual (who happens to work in PWD but that is happenstance, not a relevant factor) has been contracted by the Argentine Families Commission to maintain the Argentine cemetery near Goose Green.

Consideration had been given to having some minor work done at the Argentine cemetery in advance of the SAMA veterans visit, but it was established that this person was contracted to maintain this so there was then no need. We have no current plans to carry out work on the Argentine Cemetery.

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PUBLIC NOTICE FROM THE RETIREMENT PENSIONS BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

RETIREMENT PENSIONS FUND

CLAIMINGAPENSION

Contributors to the Retirement Pensions Fund (previously known as the Old Age Pensions Fund) are reminded to claim a pension upon reaching the age of 64 years. For widows and widowers a pension may be claimed upon reaching the age of 60 years. Claim to Pension forms can be obtained from the Pensions Office at the Treasury.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO RETIREMENT PENSION SCHEME

It is compulsory for all persons resident in the Falkland Islands between the ages of 17 to 64, and who have earnings in excess of the current limit of £175 per week, to contribute to the Fund. It is important for all contributors to have as full a pension record as possible. An incomplete pension record will result in only a partial pension at retirement.

APPLYING FOR CONTRIBUTION CREDITS

Any person who considers they are unable to afford making contributions is advised to contact the Pensions Office at the Treasury to see if they are eligible to apply to the Board of Management for assistance. Under certain circumstances the Government will pay contributions on behalf of contributors. To be eligible a person must be earning less than the current limit of £175 per week and:


- entitled to a family allowance, or
- looking after a person who is entitled to an attendance allowance, or
- unable to work due to ill health, or
- following a prescribed course of education/training, or
- actively seeking employment.

Please note that, for Camp residents, a special scheme for assistance is in place as part of the Government's rural development policy. Further information on this scheme can be obtained by contacting the Pensions Office at the Treasury.

Wool market report for week ending October 26, By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices slipped at sales in South Africa and Australia last week but increased in New Zealand.

Increases in New Zealand brought prices back into line with Australia and South Africa after their short break from selling. As shown in the attached "Mi-

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, fleece wool lots in the fibre diameter range 19 to 30 micron generally lost between 1 and 13 pence per kilogram clean. The only exception was the 25 micron category which gained 1 p/kg clean.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week down 2.5 p/kg clean at 427.2 p/kg compared to the previous weeks closing level of 429.6 pence per kilogram clean.

Buying interest was reported to be modest from China but quite strong from European top makers.

Traditional Falkland Islands buyers continued to be very active in the market place with Modiano extremely busy in the auction rooms in both Australia and South Africa.

In Australia last week 87% of the 66,813 bales offered to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 8,017 bales of crossbred wool of which 90 % were sold. In South Africa 94% of the 9,214 bales sold while in New Zealand 93% of the 8,540 bales sold.

Next week approximately 80,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in South Africa, New Zealand and Australia.







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Welcome back, boys!

25 years after they went to war, more than 200 veterans return to the Falklands

ISLANDERS have welcomed with open arms 250 British veterans and next of kin.

Visiting under the auspices of the Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) charity Combat Stress and the South Atlantic Medal Association (SAMA82) the group arrived in the Islands on Tuesday for a week of reflection and to explore the modern Falkland Islands.

That evening the veterans, most of whom are staying in the homes of Islanders, attended a welcome reception sponsored by VT Communications at the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) hall.

Early the following day they departed Stanley as part of a convoy of around 100 vehicles and headed to San Carlos via Teal Inlet for an emotional service of remembrance at the British war cometery.

After a lunch provided by San Carlos residents and the British Forces they headed to Goose Green and Fitzroy before returning to Stanley.

That evening a third of the veterans and a number of Islanders were hosted by His Excellency the Governor at the first of three receptions at Government House.

On Thursday a series of excursions took place, allowing the veterans to make more personal visits

to wherever they wished, and three groups headed respectively to Fox Bay, Port Howard and Hill Cove. A service was held on board the Falklands patrol ship. HMS *Clyde*, over HMS *Antelope* which lies in San Carlos Water.

Residents of Goose Green hosted members of 2Para on Wednesday night and some of the veterans chose to spend nights on the mountain tops they fought on 25 years ago: A group of Scots Guards camped on Tumbledown Mountain on Wednesday night and last night men from 3Para slept on Mt Longdon using tents, sleeping bags and other equipment provided by the FIDF.

Today memorial services will be held at Fitzroy and Pebble Island and a family dance, hosted by the Royal British Legion, will be held tonight in the FIDF Hall, beginning at 7.30pm.

More remembrance services are due to be held over the weekend: On Saturday evening a ceremony will be held at the Liberation Monument and Sunday is Remembrance Day, on which services will be held in Christ Church Cathedral and at the Cross of Sacrifice.

A farewell public reception, hosted by the Falkland Islands Government, Serco and Sodexho, will be held on Monday night, beginning at 7pm. UK Veterans Minister, Derek

UK Veterans Minister, Derek Twigg MP is in the Islands to coincide with the pilgrimage.

New Lan aircraft - but no change for Falklands

BOEING has announced a multibillion-dollar deal with South American airline Lan including 32 of its new 787 Dreamliners.

A spokesperson for the airline said the new aircraft will be used on both Lan's long haul and short haul routes.

The Falklands connection is tagged on to a domestic flight in Lan's scheduling and the company says the domestic routes will continue to operate with the Airbus 320, 319 and 318, in addition to a number of the new aircraft.

The routes for the new fleet have not yet been determined in any detail, the spokesperson said, but Lan currently expects their operation to the Falklands to continue next year with the existing aircraft, the Airbus 320.

New port report out now

THE Development Corporation (FIDC) has published the Royal Haskoning Report on the future of port development in Stanley.

Entitled "FIPASS Port Development Plan" it follows a visit to the Islands earlier this year by representatives of Royal Haskoning, meetings with interested parties, and wider consultation.

Within the report are some indicative plans, showing how port facilities in the FIPASS area could be expanded and improved.

Also published is the accompanying FIDC report "Moving into the Future - A New Deep Water Port for the Falkland Islands." General Manager of FIDC, Mark Brunet said the supplementary report sets the Royal Haskoning report in context; he added that one of the key outcomes of Royal Haskoning's work is an understanding of what a port needs to consist of to be appropriate to the needs of the Islands for the coming years.

FIDC are proposing a public debate on the issues surrounding port location, and anticipate a commitment to the next steps in the 2008/9 budget.

Mr Brunet commented: "Now is the time to make a decision on a new port - and the Royal Haskoning report gives the information needed to make this decision wisely."

The report is available from FIDC.

UN's Ki-moon in South America

THE UN Secretary General, Ban Ki-moon is on tour in South America this week.

Argentine press have reported him as saying that he would offer to mediate in the dispute between Argentina and Britain over the Falklands.

Spokesperson for Legislative Council Mike Summers said Ban Ki-moon had already said that it is a matter between the UK and Argentina, and that he would only act if asked to do so.

Cllr Summers commented: "He would only act if both sides requested him to do so.

"The UK will not ask him to intervene since it has no doubts about its sovereignty of the Falkland Islands." Penguin News

EMOTIONS are understandably running high throughout the Islands this week with the welcome arrival of the veterans and families of those who lost their lives here in 1982.

It was such a pleasure to see these men and women walking around Stanley on Tuesday afternoon knowing that this visit, while it will undoubtedly be very difficult, will hopefully help them to find closure.

A number of the veterans have been astonished at the open arms with which they have been received by Islanders; they feel they were just here to do a job and are genuinely bewildered as to why people would want to extend such hospitality to a bunch of old servicemen.

It's a very difficult feeling to describe but, at the end of the day, we all want to do as much as we can to show our gratitude for the sacrifice made for the Falklands. Words can't really sum up that debt we all feel - and I include those who weren't here in 1982, for we are only able to live here because of their efforts twenty-five years ago - and the guilt that many of these men and women are still suffering as a result of their war experiences.

Bearing that in mind. I was so pleased to hear this week that the target set by the British Forces based at Mount Pleasant of raising £25,000 for Combat Stress has been achieved - and possibly exceeded. I met Toby Elliott, Chief Executive of Combat Stress at the opening

I met Toby Elliott, Chief Executive of Combat Stress at the opening reception, and it appears this donation has far more significance than may immediately seem apparent.

This year is the first, he said, that the military have begun to actively support and campaign for PTSD charities - instead of turning an uncomfortably blind eye to this debilitating condition, something which the MoD has essentially done since its beginnings, they are finally publicly facing up to the mental trauma war can bring. We have all seen first hand that PTSD is a treatable - if not curable - illness but it has to be diagnosed and awareness is key. This sea change is great news.

I wish the veterans a therapeutic and enjoyable week and hope you will take away good memories of the Islands and the knowledge that we will never take your sacrifice for granted.

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Budget for wind turbines in Camp runs out early

THE government's budget for wind power in Camp has already been exhausted - just a few months into the financial year.

The Falkland Islands Development Corporation - which manages the Rural Energy Grant Scheme - applied for supplementary funding for the scheme at the last meeting of Standing Finance Committee but this was not approved; instead, SFC instructed FIDC to review the scheme and present options to ExCo.

In the past, around £55,000 had been allocated per annum by the government for the purchase of wind turbines but in recent years only a fraction of that has been needed. The Budget Select Committee therefore decided to cut the amount but demand this year has been higher than previous years and the money has run out. Councillor Andrea Clausen commented: "It has all become a bit of a mess." She explained that the programme used to be funded by EU STABEX money however now it comes from the government and this has its own implications: "We have to consider doing it in the fairest way so the people who need it and the people who are making a significant contribution to the rural community get it when they qualify for it - we are being a little more aware of how we target our assistance."

As for people who need replacement parts for their wind turbines, they will also have to find the money themselves - but this isn't new, Cllr Clausen said, as the scheme has never funded the replacement of parts.

However there has been a scheme available to replace batteries or generators if applicants meet certain criteria. This mix of schemes needs to be sorted out, Clir Clausen said, hence SFC's decision last week.

However there is no provision in the FITB budget for more loos so a case will need to be made for funding. In order to define what facilities are needed, FITB will conduct a questionnaire for cruise ship passengers.

Meanwhile signs pointing out where existing facilities are located will be put up.

Not guilty verdict in kidnap trial FIC to list four

A MAN accused of kidnap has been acquitted.

At the conclusion of a trial which lasted two days the Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson found Simon Reid not guilty of kidnapping a teenage girl.

Nevertheless Miss Thompson had a stern message for the defendant: After delivering her verdict she told him to leave the complainant alone in future. She said he had become a nuisance and pestered the girl: "You have found it difficult to walk away."

During the trial the prosecution alleged that Mr Reid, with the assistance of a teenage boy, had forced the sixteen-year-old victim into his car and took her to his home where he effectively held her against her will. The defence denied the offence had happened at all

Giving evidence through a video link the complainant said Mr Reid, with whom she had had a relationship, had obsessively followed her around town, phoning her friends and getting angry if he saw her talking to another boy.

Mr Reid's behaviour made her angry, she said: "He is trying to rule my life." She told the court he would drive past her house just



as she was getting home to make it look like he was dropping her off, and he would tell people that they were together.

The defendant took the stand on Tuesday afternoon and categorically denied that the incident had taken place.

He said he had considered himself to be in a relationship with the girl until the day of his arrest. He said they had remained in regular contact and a telephone bill from when the claimant was abroad was produced showing calls amounting to £433 to her on various numbers.

Mr Reid did not recall an incident where the claimant had been forced into a vehicle by himself or anyone instructed by him.

His defence lawyer Mr McNally submitted that inconsistencies from the prosecution's witnesses on such a scale was, "trade mark of a false account."

In finding Mr Reid not guilty on Wednesday morning, Miss Thompson said she was satisfied from the complainant's evidence that something had happened but the prosecution had failed to discharge the burden of proving the offence

However, with regard to the whether the girl was taken and held without her consent Miss Thompson said there was a "degree of ambivalence" on the part of the complainant.

As to the use of force, the Senior Magistrate said she could not rationalise the inconsistencies in evidence from the witnesses.

Custody

A hearing was held for Mr Reid on Wednesday afternoon after he was remanded in custody last week for offences separate to the kidnap allegation.

He was granted conditional bail and will reappear in court in a month.

He faces two separate counts of sexual activity with a child.

buildings?

THE Falkland Islands Company is consulting the Historic Buildings Committee (HBC) on the listing of some of its assets.

The demolition by the FIC of the former JM Dean & Son smithy last month, at the back of the store known as Basics, was met with disappointment from heritage campaigners.

Director of FIC Roger Spink has now written to archivist Jane Cameron who is on the HBC to express the company's willingness to discuss the listing of four buildings - Crozier House, Crozier Place Offices, Church House and 34 Fitzroy Road. However he remains opposed to retention and listing of Basics.

Mr Spink said Basics was a building in poor condition, and contrary to Miss Cameron's assertion na HertoPN last week, he said it was not a building of any interest to tourists.

He added that, unlike the other four buildings, there was no sensible and practical future use for Basics, due to its location embedded within the West Store Complex. He said: "For this reason, the case of Basics may be distinguished from the other four buildings.

Mr Spink said the continuing existence of Basics is prejudicial to the extension of the West Store. He commented: "As the major retail outlet in the Falklands, expansion and improvements to the store together with the provision of much needed parking, in accordance with the requirements of modern retailing, are necessary and desirable, not only in the interests of FIC, but equally in the interests of the public at large.

Recruitment frustrations

CIVIL servants are getting frustrated by the length of time involved in filling vacant posts.

At a meeting of the Public Works Committee held last week Roads Engineer Bob Hancox said there were several posts unfilled including the PWD clerk of works and materials manager.

Both Mr Hancox and his boss, Director of PWD Manfred Keenleyside, complained about the amount of time the recruitment process takes - in some cases it can take several months from initial advertising to appointment.

Councillor Andrea Clausen acknowledged this wasn't the first time such concerns had been raised and said the government is looking into the problem.



'Facebook will transform life on the Falkland Islands'

FIVE years ago 1 was on the 2002 SAMA Pilgrimage to the Falkland Islands - my role was to write a blog on our activities for the benefit of those left behind in the UK.

It was a radical initiative - blogs were still then relatively unknown and the technology was in its infancy. The actual blog itself no longer exists although what I wrote is now archived on the SAMA website in diary form. Few people in Stanley, and fewer outside, had access to the internet which was via a painfully slow and at times unreliable dial-up line.

Fast forward five years and the situation could not be more different. Broadband has arrived, of course, but the changes are more widespread than that. The world wide web itself has moved on by leaps and bounds in ways that could not have been imagined those few years ago.

The Falklands are 8,000 miles away from Britain and while they might still be remote, they are no longer isolated. No longer are you limited to plain text emails, the world wide web is a visually rich medium. Thanks to streaming video all the world's news is available on your computer, and all the world's entertainment. There are dramatic utilities such as Skype which lets you make world-wide phone calls completely free of charge. The social and business benefits to the Falkland Islands are enormous. And then there is Facebook.

Facebook will transform life on the Islands. At first glance it simply seems like a rather sophisticated social networking site, but when you get into it, you discover it has far more potential. That potential stems not just from the fact that you can interact with family, friends and business contacts all around the world, but it is live and instant. You can have your own blog, your own bulletin board, your own photo library, and it is all easy to do and under your complete control. The potential is enormous, and it's free. If you can imagine what life on the Islands was like before radio and telephones, how there were those with and those without. the same will be true of Facebook. There will be those on it, and those not on it.

At the moment, those "on it" exceed 42 million. There are dozens of Falklands-related groups already and probably more than 100 Kelpers, but that's difficult to assess. There are more than 400 people in the Falkland Islands network, but anybody can add themselves to that network and so it includes a lot of people who are just interested but not residents.

There is of course a lot of activity at the moment connected with the Falklands 25 Pilgrimage. Just search on "Falkland Islands" and see what comes up. When you see a name you recognise, click on it and you will get that person's profile.

You can add yours, you just want a mug-shot and then enter as much information about yourself as you wish to, use what others have put as a guideline. But do be aware of the risk of identity theft, for example don't put your home town or mother's maiden name - those are questions often used to recover lost passwords or financial information. You can control who gets to see parts of your information, for example you could restrict access to your mobile number to friends you have authorised. Have a look at someone's profile, you can see a list of their friends, and you can also see the groups they're in and even what books they're reading. Try it. there's bound to be somebody on there that you know.

Facebook is a boon for those in business, especially tourism. You can create a "group" for your guest house. You can add photos and text, and you can have your own bulletin board and news. Potential guests have an easy way of finding you and getting in touch. They can post comments and ask questions, they can post their own holiday photos and even videos for others to see. And you can remove anything you don't like, of course.

Here is a prediction: Facebook will make the Falkland Islands more difficult to govern. I'm not saying that's a good thing or a bad thing, but with a wider dissemination of opinion, those inclined to be outspoken will feel encouraged to do so. Everyone loves a soapbox and Facebook is an excellent platform.

On Facebook, opinion is viral, think of "rumour control" on speed-dial. FIG and the Councillors will come under a level of scrutiny and comment they cannot imagine right now, like Big Brother only the other way round. They can manage that, though, but they'll have to learn how.

Politicians in the UK are already using Facebook to get their message out, and to shape opinion about themselves and their policies, and to build support through on-line relationships. The virtual politician is almost here; the virtual friend already is.

Wind farm's capabilities encouraging


1 WOULD like to say how delighted 1 was to read of the success of the Sand Bay wind farm in last week's *Penguin News*.

Help to put Stanley on the map

THE OpenStreetMap (OSM) project wants to map the Falkland Islands, but it needs help.

The project was started to enable people to use maps in creative, productive or unexpected ways. The use of traditional maps is hampered by legal and technical restrictions that severely curtail their use. The aim of the OSM project is to create free geographic data, like street maps, that can be used by anyone, anywhere.

OSM contributors use a variety of contributed and public domain sources to create their map data. Yahoo! allows the project to use its aerial imagery, and this is currently being used to trace roads, airports, etc in the Falkland Islands.

However, this imagery is not detailed enough to add information such as the streets of Stanley. For this, local help is invaluable. Locals can edit the data, adding details like street names and road types. Those that own GPS units can trace streets, then upload their traces for use in the project.

Map data produced is

available to anyone from www.OpenStreetMap.org, one of the leading projects in the opensource mapping field.

source mapping field. Currently, OSM has mapped a large number of roads in the UK and across Europe and the project is rapidly expanding into new territories.

The project would like to complete the map of the Falkland Islands, allowing it to be used as a showcase to further promote the project and to help both tourism and local organisations benefit from freely available map data. Most on-line web sites currently have little or no data on the Falkland Islands and OSM would like to help remedy this situation.

Veterans badges presented to brave FIDF men

THE veterans of the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) from 1982 have been presented with the British Armed Forces Veterans lapel badge.

Current Officer in Command of the FIDF, Major Peter Biggs, led the badge presentation at Government House on Monday evening.

Jock Elliot was instrumental in securing the badges for the FIDF; before the presentation began he revealed some of the background to the honour.

He said the veterans lapel badge was initially introduced for the veterans of the World Wars however it was later extended to include those who served in Korea, the Falklands and other campaigns.

The lapel badge is a significant piece of jewellery, he said, because it is a way for veterans to be identified while they are in civilian attire.

The decision to extend it to the men from the Falkland Islands Defence Force who turned up for armed duty in uniform with the Royal Marines contingent on April 1, 1982 was in recognition of their bravery, he added.

FITB closes Jetty Centre carpark on no-ship days

THE Jetty Centre carpark is to be closed on days when cruise vessels are not visiting Stanley.

Concerns about how well the carpark's gravel surface will perform over this summer's tourist season have prompted the move.

At a meeting of the directors of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board

(FITB) held this week, members were told that on completion of largescale remedial work on the carpark it was closed to all traffic with the exception of FITB members' vehicles and government officials on cruise ship days.

This was seen as necessary as the Public Works Department could not guarantee how well the surface would stand up under stress from vehicles and weather.

As there is no possibility of the carpark being covered in tarmae this season. FITB said the restrictions will have to continue.

In a letter to the board, a member of FITB expressed their concern at the closure and said it was not convenient to boatsmen or other people to have to gain a key from FITB staff to unlock the carpark.

However the board of directors felt the move was necessary and approved the carpark's closure except on cruise ship days.

TV licence fees on the way?

TELEVISION licence fees may be introduced in the Falklands.

Executive Council were advised in July that the way television and radio services are delivered to the Islands by SSVC was to change to a digital system which will be accessed direct from a satellite. This means the military's need for the service delivered by the analogue TV and FM radio transmitters on Mount Maria will therefore cease.

On top of this, the risk of critical failure of the transmitter on Mount Maria has become a reality with most of the rural population now unable to access TV and some radio services.

At their meeting last month, Executive Council were asked to accept proposals submitted by SSVC for the future delivery of digital television and radio services.

ExCo spokesperson, Councillor Andrea Clausen, said this change in delivery will bring an increase in both operational and capital costs, and with it a need to introduce licence fees in order to recover the costs of this service. Prior to making its final decision on whether to proceed with SSVC's proposal, councillors will be consulting the public on their views.

Clir Clausen commented: "We want to consult on the provision of this service and the costs that will be incurred and how these are to be recovered, for example by licence fee - the level of which there has been limited discussion on.

"But with operational costs of around £300k per annum and around 1.100 households in the Islands - assuming all households took this up you would be looking at a worse case scenario of around £300 per annum. In addition there are a number of capital costs for both the individual and for the service to be delivered more generally."

She said that how the costs would be recovered has to be determined and to what degree it should be subsidised, if at all.

A consultation document will be made available in the near future which should help to clarify the situation, she added: "To this end we have requested that comments be sought over the next four weeks so that a final decision can be made in December."

Competition

Councillor Richard Stevens told Falklands Radio the digital system being considered would be an enhanced service: "You would have three channels initially - BFBS 1, BFBS 2 and Sky News - with the possibility of others in the future."

A business in Stanley currently provides a digital television service and the SSVC proposal under consideration by the government would therefore be in direct competition. Cllr Stevens commented: "There is a possibility that it would be competing but the private sector at the moment probably provide a completely different package - all the sports lovers in the Falklands, and there are quite a few, still probably wouldn't be satisfied with the programmes that are being proposed by BFBS."

He added: "In fact, it's bringing it in line with the private sector where people that want to use BFBS are having to pay."

October's weather

By the Mount Pleasant Meteorological Office SUNSHINE hours in the Falklands

were well above average last month. The mean maximum temperature for October was 11.1C, slightly above the long term average of 10.5.

The highest temperature recorded was 16.9 on the 24th and the lowest maximum was 6.1 on the 7th. The mean minimum temperature was 3.3, which is slightly above the long term average of 2.5.

The lowest minimum was -1.3on the 18th and the highest minimum of 8.4 was recorded on the 1st.

With regard to rain, it was an above average month, with a total of 38.8 mm against the normal of 34.6 mm. The wettest day was the 25th with 9.6 mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 18 days and 1.0mm or more on 12 days.

There were six days when snow or sleet fell and eight days when hail was reported - there were no days when snow was reported lying nor were there any days of thunder.

There were 213.6 hours of sunshine, much more than the average of 176.7 hours. The highest daily total was 11.6 hours on the 29th. There were three days when no sunshine was recorded.

The monthly mean wind speed was 15.3 knots, slightly below the average of 15.9 knots. The highest hourly mean speed of 33 knots occurred five times and the highest gust of 47 knots, occurred on the 23rd.

There were 19 days with gusts over 33 knots which is slightly above the average of 17.7 for the month. Gales were recorded on seven days, above the average of 5.8 for the month.

Camp teacher returns to former beat - thirty years on

A FORMER camp school teacher is returning to the Islands next week. Trevor Ambler will make a short

visit to the Falklands with his wife Rosalind on November 10.

Trevor arrived in the Falklands in December 1963 and initially taught the Saunders, Keppel and Pebble Islands beat. He remembers teaching the Pole-Evans, Thom and Alazia children, Valerie and Donald Betts and Peter Monk while on these three islands.

He then moved onto the mainland teaching at Chartres settlement where his pupils were Candy and Sandra Lang and Ann Harvey. At Green Hill (Chartres) he taught Robin, Gavin and Alistair Marsh and at Teal River (Hill Cove) he taught the McKay sisters, Shelley. Dae and Penny. Also on his beat was Shag Cove (Port Howard) and here he taught Sharon, Gwyneth and Gail Molkenbuhr.

Patrick Watts said Trevor, who is from Doncaster, spent the first part of 1964 in Stanley. He was a good football player and was regularly selected for the Stanley first eleven football team, scoring a few goals. He also played for the Mustangs league team which won the championship that season.

After three and half years as a camp teacher, Trevor returned to England in April 1967.

Trevor and Ros will head for Hill Cove soon after arriving in the Islands, where they hope to meet up with as many of his former pupils as possible. He would also like to meet anyone in Stanley who remembers him.

Price of mutton mince contains inflation

The retail price index for the quarter ending September 30 showed that inflation had risen by 1 per cent, compared to just 0.4 per cent the previous quarter, and a drop of 0.7 per cent in the quarter prior to that.

However, the most recent rise would have been markedly higher if it hadn't been for a cut in the price of minced mutton, one of a basket of items which are used to calculate inflation.

A PREFABRICATED stair is to be put in at the gulch on Sea Lion Island to make it safer to reach sea level.

A permanent builders' hoist will be put in place to haul items up by motorised winch, instead of the current sledge and chute.

The stair will be funded by EU STABEX money.

THOUSANDS of people lined the streets of Worcester to cheer as veterans from the Falklands War marched through the city centre on Saturday, October 27.

More than 60 veterans from the conflict were among around 600 people who took part in the 25th anniversary commemorative parade led by the band of the Royal Marines (Plymouth).

After months of planning organiser Deborah Ford, a Falkland Islander who now lives in Worcester. was delighted at the turnout by yeterans for the parade and cathedral service: "It has been a hard slog putting everything together but when I saw so many people participating in the parade and over 1,100 people in the cathedral I knew it

had been worth it - it has been amazing to play such a major part in this event.

Mayor of Worcester, councillor Stephen Inman, was joined by Admiral Lord Alan West, former First Sea Lord, and Lord-Lieutenant of Worcestershire Michael Brinton in saluting soldiers past and present as they marched outside the Guildhall, High Street.

Lord West, who was Captain of HMS Ardent during the Falklands War said: "Worcester has been marvellous in grabbing this opportunity. It shows that British people do admire our armed services and that they are appreciated. I can certainly see why Worcester is called the Faithful City."

Following the march, which in-





News from the Planning Committee

By Graham France IN THE absence of the Hon Richard Davies (whose presence was taken by the Hon Mike Summers), the chair was occupied by the Hon Mike Rendell for this month's meeting of the Planning and Building Committee at which all other members were present and their actions observed by four members of the public.

Environmental Planning Officer (EPO) Andrea Wright gave the meeting an update on the appeal against the refusal of planning permission for the extension to the Malvina House Hotel, and reported that Executive Council (ExCo) had considered this at their last meeting and decided to dismiss the appeal.

Following some discussion on the condition of the YPF Site on Ross Road East, which had been raised at the last meeting and considered in July 2006 also earlier in 2001, the meeting moved on to review applications for planning permission.

The first was a proposal for a one-and-a-half-storey house to be built east of the dwelling at 25 Ross Road East and which was deferred at the meeting held two months ago to allow the possibility of additional land being purchased.

The applicants, Gavin Thomas and Sharon Henry, had written to explain that this was not possible and members were invited to accept the recommendation that consent be refused on the grounds that the proposal would result in over-

development of the site.

There was considerable discussion and the committee eventually decided to grant planning permission subject to conditions, one of which was to remove "permitted development" rights so that any proposal, for example, to extend the dwelling would require an application for such consent.

Next was the proposal, deferred at the last meeting to allow consideration of other sites, for the installation of three twenty-foot containers opposite the Fire Station on St Mary's Walk. Although there was now a recommendation that temporary planning permission be granted, members felt that such forms of development should not be allowed and resolved to recommend to ExCo that it be refused on the grounds of visual amenity and not suitable for the site.

New applications

The following new proposals for development were granted conditional planning permission: a single-storey office and two semi-detached dwellings for KTV Limited on their site at Dairy Paddock Road: a single-storey extension to their dwelling at 13 Rowlands Rise for Rob and Edwina Hoy; following the granting of outline planning permission on appeal, the details of their new dwelling, fencing, fuel tank and drive- way together with temporary structures to be used during construction on land north of Moody Brook Road for Carl and Dianne Freeman; Daniel Biggs'

proposal for a dwelling at 14 Hansen Hill (a letter is to go to the applicant pointing out the requirements for distances to site boundaries which might have an impact on a second house if built on this site); a roadside sign for Saddle Computers at their new premises off Stanley By-Pass; a single-storey dwelling at Mullet Creek Farm, East Falkland for Claudio and Vinka Ross; and a two-storey extension to their house at 12 Watson Way for Richard and Miranda McKee.

Also given conditional approval was the renewal of temporary planning permission for the siting by Paz Blyth of the Coach Tea Room at Gypsy Cove Car Park. This, it was agreed, would allow such siting during the tourist season between October 1 and April 30 each year, to expire on April 30, 2010. From May 1 until September 20 annually the Coach Tea Room is to be removed from the site.

Despite a letter of objection from residents in nearby properties, Richard Gittens received conditional planning permission for the erection of two single-storey dwellings on land at 14-16 Goss Road. The committee was reminded that outline planning consent had earlier been granted for such development, and in granting detailed permission they agreed to impose a further condition requiring the maximum distance from ground to floor level is not to exceed one metre.

Just one application was deferred: Ryan Hawksworth sought permission to erect a two-storey dwelling with off-street parking on land at 2 Goss Road. Although no objections had been received for this proposal, members agreed with the EPO that a one-and-ahalf-storey house would have less impact on the surrounding area and that, in consequence, a revised design of the building should be sought.

The committee then noted the details of eight applications for building permits being dealt with by the new Building Adviser, Ken Snape, who was attending his first such meeting, then agreed to a request for a six-month extension for his off-road parking grant at 9 Kent Road by Bruce May.

Part one of the committee's business concluded with a report on progress by the EPO with the Stanley Town Plan Review. Recent public consultation had taken place on the issues and options, she advised, with 34 representations received - 21 from individuals, five from private companies, six from government departments and two from other organisations. Summarising and analysing the comments is ongoing and the results will be reported in more detail at a future meeting, members were informed. It was hoped that copies of these will be made available in the Post Office for the public to view.

The committee's next meeting is scheduled for December 6.

Listing buildings: more to do, says archivist

MORE than fifty historic buildings are listed in the Falklands but there is more work to do, according to archivist Jane Cameron.

The historic buildings committee has had a substantial measure of success in gaining the consent of the owners to the listing of buildings, Ms Cameron said, as but there are still a number of buildings that are critically significant to the Falklands architectural and social history that are still not protected: "There are probably about ten in Stanley and a dozen or so in Camp, not all of them under threat at the present time, but some in an advanced state of deterioration, or at risk of demolition."

 The buildings and structures which have been designated as being of architectural or historic interest are listed right.

One is Marmont Row, now known as the Upland Goose Hotel - the origins of the name Marmont Row are not known. If you have any idea where the name originates, please contact Penguin News.

Tony Pettersson remembered: 1944 - 2007 The man who kept Falklands printing presses running for decades

TONY PETTERSSON was born on December 11, 1944 to Beat and Axel Pettersson.

Velma was his only sister and nearly 15 years his senior. Tragically, when Tony was just four and a half years old his father was drowned in the Murrell River. The family continued to live at the Rose Hotel and took over the family business of running a pub and boarding house. There are many photos of a very young Tony sporting a mass of long, almost ringlet type curls.

With a December birthday Tony was always one of the youngest in his class. He did well at school and was later moved up a year so was then the youngest in his new class by a good margin.

In 1962 he married Heather Heathman and they had two children, Derek and Toni. Sadly Heather passed away in 1999 following a period in the UK where Tony accompanied her for medical treatment.

He then had a prolonged period in hospital in Southampton in 2004 during which time he lost half his right foot. He was admitted to hospital here again on September 2 and flown to Santiago, Chile on the 5th where he sadly passed away on October 16 after a number of further surgical procedures.

Tony's working life was spent in the Government Printing Office where he started work at just 14 as a learner on a six month probationary period. Six or seven months later. Tony was given a five year apprenticeship. backdated to his 15th birthday, earning the princely sum of 2 pounds, 2 shillings and 6 pence per week.

In his recommendation to the Colonial Secretary, the head printer Joe King wrote: "This boy has shown great promise during his probationary period; is an intelligent, studious worker and with the staff shortages prevailing in this office has had to help with many of the larger (more monotonous) routine jobs – which apprentices are normally spared – and I am yet to hear him complain."

In 1965 Tony was appointed as Assistant Printer and in 1987 he was promoted to Head Printer, retiring in 2004 due to ill health, after 45 years in Government Service. However that was not quite the end as Tony returned to the Printing Office a couple of months later as a part-time Printing Consultant/Trainer for a further four months.

Many of Tony's 45 years in the Printing Office saw him working alongside Joe King and Barry Ford. In latter years with Joe and Barry gone, it was largely Tony's experience that kept the old printing equipment still in operation.

He put in many a long Thursday evening ensuring that the *Penguin News* was ready for Friday mornings' distribution. Even after retiring, Tony could not give up and ended up working part time for Stanley Electrical who took over the printing works.

Top Falklands sportsman

Tony was always interested in sport and among others keenly followed football and boxing.

Patrick Watts recalls Tony as a brilliant sportsman, excelling in every sport he took up both at school and in later life which included football, badminton, squash, darts and rifle shooting.

Although undoubtedly one of the better darts players around. Tony never actually won a major tournament but often featured in or near the finals, particularly throughout the 1960s and 70s - he actually lost the 1969 Governor's Cup to Terry Betts. In 1967 he had the most points on the back of the card and had the most ton pluses. He was also first to score 180 in 1978.

As well as being an accomplished individual player, Tony also captained the Rose A darts team for many years and they featured in the Championship finals for seven years running from 1966 – 1972.

Shooting was a family tradition and Tony was always ready and willing to encourage the younger members in this sport. Gerald Cheek recalls Tony achieving marksmanship status first at small bore shooting in the old FIDF Hall. He then moved onto the full bore range at Sapper Hill where he made a best recorded score (then of 96) at just 14 years old.

This was followed by an incredible win of the Bishop's Trophy at the local Bisley meeting when he was only 16 competing against 33 other marksmen. Tony was chosen on a number of occasions to represent the Falklands at the National Rifle Associations annual competitions held at the Bisley ranges in Surrey and he Bisley ranges to win the Junior McKinnon Trophy in 1980.

Probably Tony's greatest accolade was that of being chosen to represent the Islands at the full bore shooting competitions at the Commonwealth Games held at Brisbane, Australia in 1982, this being the first time the Islands had ever been represented at the Commonwealth Games. Tony also proudly carried the Falklands flag



during the opening ceremony at these games.

As a young man Tony was also a motor bike enthusiast. Again Patrick recalls him having his brand new AJS bogged in a creek on the way to Horseshoe Bay and Ron Betts recounts its eventual demise on Long Island Mountain after a spill when the throttle stuck open and blew the engine.

Tony joined the football league at 15 and Patrick says he could play anywhere. When the Reds played the Blues at school. Tony would pick up the ball in his own penalty area and run the whole length of the field, banging the ball into the net at the other end. The opposing side could neither stop him or take the ball from him and Patrick says he really was a one man team, also renowned for heading goals.

When he joined the league he was the youngest player to be selected to Stanley's First X1 team and also held the record for many years as top goal scorer. This was later equalled but over more matches so effectively the record was still Tony's. Like most things he did. Tony did them young and he had retired from football by the age of 21 as he was prone to injury due to an ankle problem that he was born with.

His badminton career was also short but top notch. Games were played twice weekly in the old gymnasium where Bill Etheridge was unbeatable at senior level and Tony likewise at junior level. After a Knockout Tournament one evening at which Tony and Bill won their respective levels, it was decided to pit them against each other in an 'exhibition' game.

Patrick Watts says it was a fantastic game with both players giving everything as it developed into a real high class, competitive game. He thinks it went to three long and exciting sets with Tony beating the 'mighty' Bill Etheridge and being declared the best player in the Club. He was again only 14 or 15 years old and a few people have said it was an unforgettable performance.

Called out on April 1, 1982

Tony was an active member of the Falkland Islands Defence Force for many years.

Like many others, he reported for duty on April 1, 1982 when he and Robert MacAskill were posted to keep an eye on the Argentine YPF Fuel Depot and the Narrows. They were to report back via Harold Rowlands' phone and after a short watch, they both ended up stationed in Harold's porch.

Rag recalls that he could not have picked two better people to spend the night with - him and Tony with SLRs and Harold with a .22 rifle, being sustained by hot rum and discussions on the impending invasion and what they would like to do with the invaders.

They were to report back to the FIDF headquarters after the gunfire at Government House, so they made their way up John Street, having a few hairy moments hiding in the grass behind Stanley House when they thought gunfire was whistling past them. Apart from the FIDF Members caught at Government House, Rag and Tony were probably last to return to base.

Tony was able to accompany other members of the FIDF on a 25th Anniversary Parade earlier this year, before they received commemorative lapel badges from His Excellency the Governor. Tony was also awarded a long service medal in recent years.

Out of work and sport, he took an interest in his garden, fishing and cards. He could often be seen sneaking off to the Malo River in the wee small hours of the morning and returning for dinner with a good catch. It was rarely that he missed a good game of bridge at the hospital day centre and he regularly featured in the prize list.

He was a keen sports goer and spent many years serving in the tote hut and helping to run sweepstakes both for the Sports Association and the Rifle Club when he might have been persuaded to dice for the odd book of tickets.

As with most of his sporting career, Tony bowed out early and he will be sadly missed by his family, friends and colleagues. He leaves behind his son Derek and daughter-in-law Trudi, daughter Toni and son-in-law Richard and grandchildren Caris, Liam and April.

Wool market report for week ending November 2. By Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices oscillated by a small amount around last weeks prices at sales in Australia but fell marginally in New Zealand and South Africa.

As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide" table, fleece wool lots moved in price by between -3 and + 5 pence per kilogram clean across the micron spectrum

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished the week up slightly at 427.4 p/kg compared to the previous weeks closing level of 427.2 pence per kilogram clean.

Buying interest was reported to be quite strong with Chinese and European top makers quite active.

International currency issues and global financial market factors were stated as having a significant impact on market activity

In Australia last week 86% of the 63,292 bales offered to the trade changed hands. Included in the offering were 6,281 bales of crossbred wool of which 86 % were sold. In South Africa 97% of the 7.716 bales sold while in New Zealand 81% of the 8,800 bales sold.

Next week approximately 70,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale in South Africa, New Zealand and Australia. Note:

Civil servants' resignations highlight recruitment troubles

IN THE past week, two civil servants have opted to terminate their employment contracts early.

Environmental Planning Officer Andrea Wright is to leave the Islands one year into her three year contract and Community School Science teacher Alexander Tkaczynski has resigned after just a few months in post.

The government's Chief Executive, Dr Mike Blanch, was unwilling to comment on the individuals' decisions to leave but he confirmed they were unrelated. He commented: "Turnover of staff occurs throughout the civil service. In any organisation people sometimes decide that a job is not for them."

The news of the resignations comes at a time when the government is finding it increasingly difficult to recruit professionals from overseas.

Dr Blanch said the reasons for this are being researched: "Leaving state-funded pension schemes can be a problem, for instance." Councillor Mike Summers said

Councillor Mike Summers said he did not believe the recent resignations related to pay issues but acknowledged that in the past there have been imbalances between wages that the Falklands offers compared to other countries.

Increases to civil servants' pay in the Islands were largely in accordance with the cost of living index, he said, whereas in the UK some areas of civil service pay had increased substantially more, for reasons to do with their economy and markets.

Cllr Summers commented: "This occasionally causes imbalances in pay scales - as an example the government relatively recently negotiated revised pay levels for doctors as a direct result of this imbalance, whereas we pay newly qualified teachers more than they might expect at home."

He added that the Falklands recruit in alternative markets where possible, mainly other English speaking Commonwealth countries with similar standards.

CIIr Summers commented: "The Chief Executive has been asked to produce a report to Executive Council on the issue of pay and conditions for civil servants, specifically related to these differentials and recruitment difficulties in some areas, and we will consider the implications of that during the budget deliberations."

I know of one Stanley woman who, upon receiving a wave from one of these policeman. promptly checked her speedometer, seatbelt, etc in panic before she realised she wasn't being flagged down and they were, in fact, just saying hello.

I find myself grinning from ear to ear at the sight of the boys in blue standing on street corners, rocking on their heels and enjoying a yarn with passers-by while keeping an eye on the school 'chuck out' traffic (far more effective than sleeping policemen) - not to mention a landlady friend of mine who appreciates a friendly wave or rap on the window to check she is OK on a regular basis. It is so damned suitable for Stanley and shows that community policing is alive and well. Long may it remain so.


My only wish is that a 'good clip round the ear' could be made legal as I hate to see kids appearing in court at ridiculously young ages - but perhaps that is just me showing my age!

A low crime rate is something we like to boast and might even be further reduced with this attitude to policing - as long as staffing is kept at a level that can maintain this kind of approach.

A NUMBER of people (myself included) were annoyed in the early stages of the 2007 planning that there was such an emphasis placed on commemoration, not celebration. It reached the extent that those of us who planned to celebrate were made to feel it would be less than respectful and could possibly paint a poor picture of the Falklands.

I hope that lessons have been learned by all: It is more than possible to commemorate *and* celebrate when like minded souls gather together as we did last week. The huge level of respect we had for each other was sufficient to leave those living under the Labour government - who have been bemoaning the lack of respect in the UK for many years - in awe.

While our aim was to help veterans feel at ease and find their peace, I gather from several Falklands residents there is no doubt that this was returned two fold in many cases and appreciated beyond words.



Indulgence flights for vets?

THE UK's minister for veterans says he is looking at whether indulgence flights to the Falklands can be made available to men and women who served in the 1982 war.

Derek Twigg was in the Islands to join the 250 veterans on their pilgrimage. He said the experience had been fascinating: "I have been bowled over by the generosity and kindness of the local people toward our veterans. Every veteran l've spoken to has said they've been quite overwhelmed by the kindness of the Islanders."

Mr Twigg said he had seen firsthand the benefits the pilgrimage had brought to veterans, allowing them a chance to lay ghosts to rest.

For some years, Islanders and veterans have urged British politicians to consider offering reduced price - or "indulgence" - flights to veterans to make it easier for them to travel to the Falklands. This idea is now being looked in to, Mr Twigg said, but he had reservations, particularly as indulgence passengers can be bumped off the airbridge flight at a moment's notice. He commented: "For someone

He commented: "For someone with PTSD who had been trying to gear themselves up to make the trip then found, for operational reasons, they couldn't get on the flight at the last minute, it wouldn't be helpful for them.

"There are problems, but I'm looking to see if we can get around them and I hope we can make some announcements in the coming weeks about it"

Sunday's Remembrance service held in Christ Church Cathedral was interrupted by veteran Gus Hales who told the congregation that he and his counterparts had been let down by politicians (see story on page 9.)

Mr Twigg said there were many issues veterans felt strongly about but the government was doing more than ever for ex-servicemen: "If you see what was available in terms of support and welfare to the veterans in 1982 compared to what is available today, there is a significant difference.

"Things have moved on greatly but some obviously feel very emotional and aggrieved about the way they were treated in the past. My job is to make sure we continue to improve the services."

Cllr Summers: Public is free to meet FCO reps

COUNCILLOR Mike Summers has defended the decision not to schedule a public meeting with Foreign Office representatives who are due to visit next month to discuss the Constitutional review.

Two weeks ago a number of readers were annoyed when *Penguin News* reported Cllr Summers as saying the delegation was not coming to conduct public surveys and that any lobbying members of the public wished to do should be aimed at the Select Committee on the Constitution.

In response to their concerns, Cllr Summers said he and his colleagues had no problem with members of the public meeting officials from the Foreign Office if they wished: "Indeed I am more than happy to ask the Governor to arrange for them to attend a public meeting if there is sufficient interest."

Counteracting criticism, Cllr Summers said it was because councillors were confident in the democratic process that such a meeting had not been scheduled. He said: "It is after all the democratically elected government that is responsible for the internal affairs of the Falklands, not the Foreign Office.

"The Foreign Office is, I believe, entirely satisfied that the correct procedure is for it to negotiate developments in the Constitution with the elected government, which is what it has already done in other overseas territories. When a new draft Constitution is available as a result of those negotiations it will once again be issued for further consultation."

Cllr Summers said the Falklands spent a lot of time and effort to demonstrate to others that it was responsible for its own affairs, and did not remain under colonial status. He commented: "Long may it be so; that is the exercise of the right to self-determination."

Haskoning report: FIPASS repair is a matter of urgency

THE lack of port development is stifling the fishing and tourism industries and both sectors have stressed that income will be lost if suitable facilities are not soon in place, according to a report commissioned by the government. Costing £32,000, the Royal

Costing £32,000, the Royal Haskoning report - the fourth since 1983 when FIPASS was put in place as an 'interim' port - examined ways in which the FIPASS site could be developed to accommodate the future mantume infrastructure needs of the Falkland Islands.

It concluded that the maintenance of FIPASS was a matter of "some urgency" and warned that the loss of the facilities offered there, regardless of future growth, would have severe consequences for activity on the Falklands and in its waters.

Taking a narrow commercial view, however, the report said it was difficult to justify the expenditure required to develop the facilities.

An economic analysis may be needed to justify the expenditure, warned the report, however the revenue assumed to be available to fund port development was limited. Royal Haskoning advised that FIG considered releasing other forms of revenues, such as harbour dues, to improve the viability of the proposed development.

"FIG should enter into discussions with stakeholders, principally the fishing industry and the cruise industry, with a view to developing a much closer relationship with them, in terms of the development of port facilities and ideally obtaining some form of commitment that if facilities are provided they will be used," advised the report.

In an accompanying paper, FIDC General Manager Mark Brunet said that hydrocarbon companies still in the exploratory phase had made it clear they could operate from the existing facilities: "In the event the industry moves to a development phase, the situation will change rapidly, both in terms of requirements and the ability to find finance," he said. "That means it is appropriate to take decisions now without par-



ticular concern for the hydrocarbon sector beyond the ability to support exploration."

According to Royal Haskoning, the FIPASS remedial works plan produced by the current Port Management Team seemed "reasonable" with the estimate of £3.4 million produced by individuals who have a good working knowledge of the facility and the local construction market.

However principal issues that need to be addressed to prolong its useful working life included returning the structure to its original condition or at least preventing further deterioration, enabling 40 foot containers to be handled safely, improving berth use and the general levels of safety and operational efficiency of the working areas.

Additional facilities will be required when there are more containers for export than FIPASS can handle, berth use becomes unacceptably high, or the size of cruise vessels wishing to come alongside exceeds the capacity of FIPASS.

In this event the report contained a number of suggestions to enlarge the port depending on industry growth. These included a main quay, link to the shore, container yard, cold stores and a lay-up berth, with estimated costs between £45 - £76 million depending on the level of infrastructure required by local industry growth. Although the report is directed at the FIPASS area, should the decision be taken to build in a different area Councillor Andrea Clausen assured that the recommendations could be "lifted and shifted" elsewhere. The next move, she said, was to obtain costings for different sites before a paper was put to the Budget Select Committee outlining the outcomes.

The decision on the siting of the port would be dependent on the draught that can be obtained, with dredging of not only the FIPASS berthing area itself but also the Narrows, explained Cllr Clausen.

Bathymetric and geotechnical surveys will have to be undertaken and paid for, she said. She added: "It may be a waste of time, it is a gamble, but I don't think we have a choice, particularly if we are going to pay out to prolong the life of FIPASS."

A common sense approach is needed, said ClIr Clausen: "It's now down to the FIDC General Manager to co-ordinate feedback and provide more figures, so that a decision can be made.

"Issues like depth of draught and vessels that can get in and alongside need to be addressed and we need some more information on the costs of dredging, which is key," she concluded.

Quake rocks northern Chile

A POWERFUL earthquake hit northern Chile on Wednesday, killing at least two people, injuring more than 100 and flattening at least 1,200 homes.

No Falkland Islanders are believed to have been on holiday in the area at the time.

The quake - lasting about 50 seconds - sent panicked residents out into the streets. It could reportedly be felt in the capital Santiago, 1,260km to the south.

Chile's National Emergency Office director, Carmen Fernandez, described it as a "major quake."

Both of the deaths caused by the earthquake happened in Tocopilla.

Travel agent Jennic Forrest of International Tours and Travel Ltd commented: "Although the Atacama Desert is a very popular destination for our clients we don't currently have anyone in that area."

Man to be tried for rape of a child

A TWENTY-year old man is to be tried on indictment in the Supreme Court charged with the rape of a child under the age of 13.

The man who cannot be named for legal reasons appeared in the Magistrate's Court on Thursday; Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson said she was satisfied with the admissibility of the evidence presented to her and formally committed the case to trial.

Chilean ambassador to visit

THE British ambassador to Chile, Howard Drake, arrives in the Falkland Islands tomorrow.

Mr Drake will spend a week in the Islands, accompanied by his wife, Gill.

Earlier this month, Councillor Mike Summers said Mr Drake would be coming to familiarise himself with Falklands issues: "Like all other British South American ambassadors, he has to deal with the Falklands/Argentine issue on a regular basis."

DHL freight on the way

DUE to a lack of space on the Lan flight there is a backlog of Falklands DHL freight waiting in Chile.

This is now expected to arrive in the Islands by alternative means in the middle of next week. When it arrives the Chamber of Commerce will ensure it is sorted and made available to customers as soon as possible.

Chamber president Roger Spink said DHL is taking up the issue of lack of space during busy periods with the airline. He commented: "We would like to thank customers for their understanding during this difficult period and are seeking ways to restore reliability to the service." ARRIVING in Stanley on November 7, 1982 on the *Norland*, a mere slip of a girl at just 19, Lucy Ellis was the first person to emigrate to the Falklands after the war.

She had been working with and become close friends with Islander Kathleen Dobbyns while working at a veterinary office in Penzance, Cornwall.

UK behind on mines

C&W to compensate Stanley clients awaiting broadband

NEW customers wishing to sign up to broadband from Cable and Wireless are facing a wait.

The telecoms company now has a waiting list for new Stanleybased customers who would like to sign up to the Broadband service.

To soften the blow, Cable and Wireless Chief Executive Aaron Richardson said those on the waiting list will have their first month's facility fee waived.

He explained: "That means for example, for a person signing up for the £19.99 Bronze package (or £24.99 if they do not have a post-pay mobile phone) the first monthly fee of £19.99 will be waived, and they will only be responsible for any usage above and beyond their included 300 MB in their first month of operation."

Mr Richardson said the company is also experiencing some frustration caused by a freight delay.

He explained: "We have, unfortunately, crucial telecommunications equipment currently waiting in Santiago. Indeed our new card platform has been bumped off the plane three weeks in a



row."

The card platform will allow Cable and Wireless to expand their ADSL operation. Mr Richardson said. "An exciting key development that this will allow is the siting of several Wi-Fi hotspots throughout Stanley. mainly concentrated around hotels and other strategic locations.

"We are also looking at ways for our pre-paid Cable and Wireless cards to be usable for Wi-Fi access. This is similar to what many customers may have experienced in many places such as international airports, coffee shops, trains and such like."

In addition, through the setup of Wi-Fi nodes in certain locations customers will be able to have a wireless-only connection to the internet, without the physical need for a fixed line telephone point. This expands the size of Cable and Wireless's virtual network, and allows the company to have more users on the system at any one time, Mr Richardson said.

He added: "We are currently is discussions with several businesses, tourist hotspots as well as the Ministry of Defence about the potential roll-out of Wi-Fi in Stanley and possibly other locations."

The company is planning to fly someone in on the airbridge and they will be hand carrying the interface card.

"It is our only option," Mr Richardson said. "They are due in on Friday. Once their feet are dry, we will commence the expansion in earnest and build in the upgraded capacity as soon as practicable."

He said existing users should experience their normal service during this period.

Cable and Wireless International this week announced its third consecutive six-month period of revenue growth, with growth in mobile and broadband outstripping declines in fixed line voice services. A NEW report launched on Tuesday by the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research states that not all countries are on track to meet the deadline of removing antipersonnel landmines by 2010.

The list includes the United Kingdom for clearance of the Falklands.

The report, published by the International Campaign to Ban Landmines, says that 14 countries including the UK are unlikely to meet their mine clearance deadlines under the Convention on the Prohibition of the Use, Stockpiling, Production, and Transfer of Anti-Personnel Mines which came into force in March 1999. 



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Have councillors achieved 'openness' targets?

Two years on from the election which focused on increased transparency in decision making, Penguin News asks councillors how they have managed to open up government

TOMORROW is the second anniversary of the election of Legislative Council.

Beginning a two part feature to mark the occasion, Penguin News asked councillors whether, in an age in which the public demands more transparent decision making than ever before, they have managed to deliver on their manifesto pledges.

DURING the run up to the election on November 17, 2005 a number of the candidates - including first tim-ers Andrea Clausen, Janet Robertson and Richard Davies - campaigned strongly for increased transparency in the government's decision making.

However public opinion suggests that the candidates failed to deliver on this once in office and voters are none the wiser on how decisions are taken. The three believe this criticism is not entirely fair.

Cllr Clausen said she campaigned on transparency in relation to decisions made in General Purposes Committee (GPC) and Executive Council (ExCo): "Regarding GPC, a discussion was held shortly after the election at which I made my case. The result of that discussion was that a clear separation was made between ExCo papers, where non-ExCo members have an opportunity to make comments on the ExCo papers to ExCo members, but on which no decisions are made, and all other business

Of the latter almost all matters except those of a personal or commercial nature are reported on as soon as possible following the meeting

She admitted there had been no obvious progress on opening up ExCo. but remained of the view that there was scope for an "Open and Closed approach" to ExCo meet-ings: this, she said, will be further considered as councillors progress their discussions on the Constitution. She commented: "It is worth pointing out that it is simply a fact that if meetings are pushed into being public there is a good chance that debate will actually be stifled as some committee members will not feel comfortable expressing their opinions in public.

Cllr Davies said people were unhappy not because they didn't know what decisions were being made, but they didn't know how they were made. He commented: "In general FIG is fairly transparent as regards access to information, although there is room for improvement. The real problem is that much of the debate leading to these decisions takes place in private - at GPC or ExCo.

"People have an understandable desire and right to know why a specific decision was taken and what stance individual councillors took. This is what we have to improve.

He said there was no good reason why most of this discussion could not take place in public: "Traditionally this is how government has worked here and it is about changing those habits. The obvious forum for such debate is LegCo but personally find the meetings infrequent, ritualistic and stultifying - I think with such a small legislature we could afford something more informal.

"In addition I believe ExCo minutes should be more detailed, and in general should be published, giving us information about decision making in that forum."

He felt it was too early to judge whether councillors had failed to deliver on their promises of increased transparency: "I think that's a criticism to make at the end of the four year term. Two years on I have developed clearer ideas about practical ways to increase transparency and intend to have a debate about them in the next LegCo. Change should not be delayed unnecessarily, but we need to get it right.

Cllr Robertson said that if people have the time to pursue it, they could be very well informed about the issues of the day through the committee system, either through attendance or by reading the minutes

However she added: "The issue is to provide the means for analysing policies and decisions in a public forum. Both councillors and the press have a crucial role to play in this: disseminating information and differing view-points to the public is as much a part of the democratic process as access to information. and I don't believe we do this as well as we should."

GPC - closed door decisions

During the run up to the election, a number of candidates campaigned to get rid of GPC, saying that decision making and debate should not be held behind closed doors. However just a week after they were elected councillors announced that GPC would remain.

So, are the candidates who wanted to open up the workings of government comfortable that this decision making continues to be done in private?

Cllr Davies was not. He commented: "Most decision making should take place under public scrutiny. This will increase democracy and accountability, because people will know what councillors are doing and saying on their behalf.

Personally, I would like people to know what I thought and said on issues, rather than presenting a consensus decision. We should continue to work by consensus when possible, but reach that consensus in public.

Having said that, he felt it was useful for councillors to meet regu-larly in private but was firm that policy should not be made in that forum. He commented: "GPC has moved away from 'instructing' ExCo councillors, which is a step in the right direction. Part of the problem is that ExCo papers are confidential, and so cannot be discussed publicly. I think that is hard to justify for many papers.

Cllr Clausen admitted it was easy

to campaign on getting rid of some-thing she did not have a full understanding of. Having now experi-enced GPC meetings for the past two years she said there is in fact "very little" decision making at GPC

She commented: "Most of the meeting is dominated by discussions on ExCo papers, and updates with the Governor and Chief Executive. Other issues raised are usually included in the press briefs when not of a commercial or personal nature.

Cllr Robertson said GPC gave councillors an opportunity to exchange views on matters of policy but left ExCo members to vote freely at their meetings. She commented: "GPC is not a

decision-making body. but is a meeting between councillors where issues can be raised and business discussed, including ExCo papers.

'It is important that all councillors have an opportunity to debate the issues raised in the papers, even though any views raised can be disregarded by ExCo members and periodically are.

However, she added, that as all decisions are made at ExCo, the issue of how business at ExCo should be conducted needed discussion and whether this forum should be made more open to the public. Debate in the House

In her election manifesto. Cllr Robertson said a truly democratic system allowed for debate and scrutiny at the highest levels of government. However the agenda for the last meeting of Legislative Council (LegCo) - which ended up being postponed - contained no questions for oral answer from any members. Where is the debate we should be having?

Whilst she said the questions and answers element of LegCo could be used to good effect to openly air and debate issues, Cllr Robertson added that there was arguably some limitation in that LegCo sessions were generally held only every two months. She commented: "Sometimes this means that particular issues that are very current and deserve to be debated extensively in public have moved on by the time LegCo comes around."

She added that there was also some concern that as LegCo is held a day after ExCo meetings, issues can be a month or two old before questions can be asked in public. think there is an opportunity for further discussion on how we can improve the manner in which debate and the processes of scrutiny are conducted."

Most - not all - councillors acknowledged there is a need for them to debate issues more publicly.

Cllr Mike Summers said the Select Committee on the Constitution had held a lot of discussion on how to encourage greater debate in LegCo. He commented: "I believe we have begun to see some more discussion of Bills in the House, though there is still much room for improvement, and this should be supported by the new portfolio system.

In respect of questions for oral answer in LegCo, he said it was up to individual councillors how they used that device - but admitted that in many cases it was to put information (to which they already know the answer) into the public domain. "We have given some thought to the idea adopted elsewhere that the public should be permitted to pose questions, which we should perhaps pursue. There is of course substantial debate elsewhere in committees and at public meetings."

Cllr Davies agreed, adding that he was careful not to put any items in the 'closed' part of committee agendas unnecessarily. However he added: "Some debate takes place in GPC and I believe the key to this is to move it into the open. It may be useful to have more frequent, more informal meetings of LegCo. That could lead to more questions and debate. It would not be helpful to judge members on how many questions they ask: it is the relevance and importance of the issues that counts.

Cllr Clausen admitted there was not enough public debate going on and more effort needed to be made to rectify this. However she added: "Where we have had questions in LegCo the Speaker has been very generous in accommodating a very full debate with quite broad supplementary questions and that is key to facilitating the debate."

Clirs Richard Cockwell, Ian Hansen and Richard Stevens said there was no point in asking questions for questions' sake while Cllr Mike Rendell felt it should not only be up to councillors to create de-bate: "There is a real opportunity for the media itself to create debate by asking questions, but perhaps they just don't have the time, which is sometimes a problem for members, too.

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Pilgrims' 'total gratitude' to Islanders

AS WE leave the Islands at the end of the 2007 Falklands veterans pilgrimage I would like to send a short message to the population of the Islands.

This pilgrimage is the culmination of almost two years of planning from the time that the idea was first discussed. It has been a cooperative venture between SAMA and Combat Stress which has resulted in 250 people being able to make the journey, the majority of whom had not been back since 1982.

There was understandably a degree of apprehension amongst some of the pilgrims before leaving UK who could not imagine how they would feel arriving back after 25 years. Once on the ground in the Islands it has been a roller coaster of emotions with everyone having their own particular memories or reasons for being here. This was highlighted before we actually arrived, by the Monarch Airlines Captain who flew the leg from Rio to MPA who had been a Victor Tanker pilot during the conflict and involved in several of the Black Buck Vulcan bombing raids.

Having arrived and met our

hosts and started on the programme of events, it quickly became clear to everyone that this was going to be a week to remember. The enthusiasm, the generosity, the hospitality and the kindness shown by all of you here in the Islands to us arriving on the pilgrimage has been completely overwhelming.

It is no exaggeration to say that we all feel humbled and eternally grateful for such a display of welcome. It has been a proof, if indeed that were needed, that the achievements of the Task Force in 1982 were so much appreciated by everyone in the Islands. It leaves us with an enormous sense of pride to know that what was accomplished continues to be so important in your lives.

I am especially pleased that the pilgrimage involved a complete cross section of people involved in Operation Corporate in 1982, including Royal Navy, Royal Marines, Army, Royal Air Force, Royal Fleet Auxiliary, Merchant Navy, nurses, a MOD civil servant as well as staff from Combat Stress.

Additionally of course we have had the honour to have with us 17 family members of some of the servicemen who did not return in 1982. For them it has been a very emotional trip but I know that they have all found tremendous comfort from the reception that we have received.

Probably my abiding memory of the trip, apart from the weather for the Remembrance Day service, will be the willingness of you all here to go to such extraordinary lengths to help us. This might have been in driving, in accommodating, in going that extra 'mile' to find something out or find a particular location for a pilgrim - I find myself unable to adequately describe how we appreciate everything that has been done for us.

Before finishing I would like to pay tribute to Gary Clement, his SAMA FI committee and everyone else who has worked so tirelessly to achieve this wonderful event. This has been a magnificent team effort - I wish I could name you all who were involved but I will not try. You know who you were and you have our total gratitude.

Finally, a message to you all from Baroness Thatcher. You may know that she came to our predeparture reception in London before we left to come here. She wished us a most successful pilgrimage and also asked me to pass on to all the people of the Falkland Islands her best wishes and thoughts at this time of remembrance and for the future.

Thank you all from the bottom of our hearts for your magnificent efforts for us during the last week - I know that many of us have every intention of returning to see you and be with you again in the future.

Camic Data Master is still legally at work

STANLEY man David Lambert was fined and banned from driving for 18 months in the Senior Magistrate's Court on Friday.

Mr Lambert changed his plea to a drink driving charge to guilty after Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson made evidence relating to the drink driving charge admissible.

Defence lawyer Richard Marlor had made an application for evidence to be inadmissible on the grounds that the Camic breath testing device used by the police on Mr Lambert had not been formally approved by the Governor and Council for use in the Islands as is legally required.

Making the evidence admissible Miss Thompson said that while the particular Camic Data Master used to test the level of alcohol Mr Lambert had consumed on March 21, had not specifically been approved it was covered by approval given to the previous machine which was the same type and used the same technology.

Miss Thompson said however that it would have been sensible if approval had been sought for the machine, "...so as to avoid the kind of scientific argument we find ourselves in."

The case

Crown Counsel Julia Kraehling-Smith told the court that the police received a report soon after 11pm on March 21 that a Land Rover Discovery which had been parked on Fitzroy Road had been driven off at speed clipping the parked vehicle in front of it.

At 11.15pm police located the vehicle outside Mr Lambert's home on Dean Street and found him in an intoxicated state, unsteady on his feet and slurring, Ms Kraehling-Smith told the court

He was taken to the Police Station where he provided a specimen of breath giving a lower reading of 103mg of alcohol per 100ml of breath (35mg is the legal limit).

Ms Kraehling-Smith said Mr Lambert claimed to have drunk three bottles of beer after reaching his home and became uncooperative with the police. He was placed in custody for the night.

Addressing the court Mr Lambert said there had been no damage to the other vehicle, adding that he had offered the empty beer bottles at his home to the police who made no effort to check them out and see if they were indeed freshly emptied. "Their attitude at the time was not quite right," he said.

Referring to his change of plea, Mr Lambert said he had considered it to be in the public's interest as much as his own to plead not guilty to the charge so the question of whether the Camic Data Master was legally approved could be clarified.

Forensic advice had been sought as to what the alcohol content would have been without the three beers consumed after the incident and before testing at the Police Station - this was calculated at 71 mg.

The Senior Magistrate said she was minded to sentence on this lower reading as the Prosecution could not disprove Mr Lambert's claim that he had consumed alcohol after returning home.

In addition to the 18 month driving ban, Mr Lambert was fined £600 with prosecution costs of £100. He is due to leave the Islands later this month.

First St Dunstan's veteran visits Islands

THE pilgrimage may be over but a small group of veterans remain in the Falklands this week as part of a Royal British Legion travel group.

They are led by tour guide Major Bob Darby, a member of the Guild of Battlefield Guides, who served in the Falklands with 3Para in 1982.

The group also includes the first man to be referred to the Islands by the charity St Dunstan's.

Steve Tuffen was injured in the battle for Goose Green and is accompanied in the Islands by former theatre sister Nikki Pugh who cared for him aboard the hospital ship Uganda and now works with SAMA as a Voluntary Carer for pilgrims.

St Dunstan's is the UK's national charity that provides assistance to blind ex-servicemen and women and their families, helping them to live independently in their own community.

The organisation has centres located near Brighton and in Sheffield; the national centre at Ovingdean, Brighton, was purpose built for blind ex-service men and women in 1938.

Widow deprived of pension Guide saddened by pay rumours

DURING this last week's commemorative gatherings and SAMA pilgrimage it was a time of 'high emotion', as mentioned by the PN, for many people -importantly in many different ways, hence it would have been wrong to write I felt, or to involve any of the men my father (Terry Peck) knew in the following matter.

They expressed their admiration for his bravery and to be in their company was truly special, which was how I felt it should stay. It is a separate matter, concerning the administration here that is the shocking part.

When my father died you would imagine - given that Islands' glossy literature states people are caring, accommodating, etc, that the issue of my father's pension would have been resolved in five minutes

Can you imagine how his wife Eleanor must feel, now some ten months later, about how the Falkland Islands Government, together I assume with a token Councillor or two, have on a number of occasions refused to give Eleanor my father's pension, from his time as Chief of Police? The last flimsy offer was a figure equivalent to four years of that pension and then nothing

There have of course been reasons given - the changing of systems, my father not being married to Eleanor when he was serving etc - which simply leaves you shaking your head. I imagine one should think it's just bad luck. But it is not bad luck. It is small minded, pettiness on the part of an administration whose generosity and intellectual capacity for seeing the bigger picture - and the true worth of taking care of such idiosyncrasies in a small community - is truly lacking.

We are not a population of fifty thousand, having to stick to the rule book. Why is that sort of mentality so prevalent here?

It is not as if Eleanor has asked for some sort of twenty foot monument, or that anything need be glorified. It is simply a case of appreciating her twenty-three years with my father as meaning something - and his action when a time for action was called for. This is a slap in the face to her.

It was upsetting too, this week, when several members of the Parachute Regiment wondered where she was. I could not tell the truth, in how upsetting she finds this situation; hence Eleanor's wish not to be at functions. Meanwhile at the same gatherings those responsible for Eleanor's predicament swan around as if they had been on a hillside some twenty-five vears ago.

This is not a glorified speech about my father but a sad indictment of ineptness and managerial spitefulness that has become so prevalent in the islands. I truly salute the men who stood by my father's spot in the memorial wood.

That they fought so such spineless wonders we are left with here can go about their business without seeming to be aware of Eleanor's plight is disgraceful. James Peck Stanley

At 10pm that night in sleet snow and heavy rain myself, Alistair and Bernie came off the mountain in our respective vehicles, having taken up sleeping bags, bivvies, ration packs, heating equipment (all supplied by Major Peter Biggs of the FIDF), torches, a mobile phone, a large stack of firewood which Alistair had thoughtfully gathered up, and a bottle of Jack Daniels, such was our concern for the lads. We left them with a roaring fire and in good spirits.

The following morning at 6am I was again on the mountain picking up Gordon and Jim because they had an 8am FIGAS flight to Hill Cove where they had a wonderful time, partying and recalling their experiences there in '82.

As we came off the mountain and enquired of the events of the night, Gordon turned to me and said, "I have never laughed so much in 25 years - I feel like a new man, I don't need Combat Stress any more.

That is what a SAMA pilgrimage is all about, and I find it rather sad that a few people seem more concerned with trying to find fault with internal accusations which are petty and unnecessary. Patrick Watts MBE

Chief Executive Taylor dies

THE Falklands' government's first Chief Executive has died.

David Taylor CBE passed away in London this week at the age of 74, following an illness which affected his lungs.

He was Chief Executive from 1983 to 1987 and returned to the Islands in that position for eight months in 1988.

In addition to leading the public service through the post war re-construction, one of his main roles in the Falklands was to implement the key recommendations of the Shackleton Report.

This included further civil service reform, the process of land reform (farm subdivision), setting up the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) and the creation of the fisheries zone.

He was appointed Governor of Montserrat from 1990 to 1993 and was awarded the CBE (Commander of the British Empire) in 1993. He was a Trustee of Falklands Conservation from 1996-2001.

David and his partner Carole returned to the Islands in 2002 (the 20th Anniversary of Liberation) as guests of the Falkland Islands Government.

Councillor Mike Summers commented: "David was a very influential member of the Falkland Islands Government in the post war period.

"His enthusiasm and work ethic carried the government team through a number of major and momentous decisions for the Islands, which set the scene for future development."

Cllr Summers added: "He remained committed to the Falkland Islands and still has a number of friends in the Islands."

His funeral will be private. however a memorial service will be held in the UK in January.

Veterans' thank you gift to Islanders



TWO park benches have been placed on Stanley's Victory Green to thank Islanders for the hospitality they extend to veterans when they return to the Falklands.

In a ceremony which followed the veterans parade at the Liberation Monument (see overleaf), Major General Malcolm Hunt RM made the presentation. He told the gathering of veterans and Islanders: "For those of us who took part in the conflict in 1982, it was an experience we shall never forget. But on this 25th anniversary, for those of us who were in the Task Force the warmth, the reception and the generosity of the people of the Falkland Islands on our return has been almost overpowering."

He continued: "It is something that we shall never forget and in order that you don't forget us, we have offered these benches from the members of this pilgrimage in order that in the future, the people who are now young will be able to look out on this scene, the beautiful Islands before them, and reflect on the past and look forward to an inspiring future."

Para's victory: 'Deep in my mind, where nobody goes'

HUNDREDS of people who gathered in Christ Church Cathedral and the parish hall on Remembrance Sunday broke into applause following an unscheduled recitation of poetry by a veteran.

Gus Hales, who served with 9 Para Royal Éngineers in 1982, interrupted the church service and addressed the congregation. He told the gathering that 308 men had committed suicide since the end of the war, most of them because of what they saw as the neglect of politicians. He then recited this poem:

Every year on Remembrance Sunday, I sit in the corner of a British Legion bar,

Dressed in blazer, shirt, regimental tie, polished shoes, with my head held high.

But deep in my mind, where nobody goes, I see a wooden cross where the wind of victory blows.

Three cheers for victory, 'I heard the politicians say, but they never asked me about my victory

And if they did, I would have explained it this way:

It isn't your flags or your emblems of war, or your marching of troops past the palace's door

It isn't Mrs Thatcher on the balcony high, reaffirming her pledge to serve or die,

But it's the look and the pain on a teenager's face, as he dies for his country in a far off place.

It's the guns and the shells and the phosphorous grenades, the dead and the wounded, the freshly cut graves,

Or a grieving wife with a fatherless child, whose young tender love will be forever defiled,

Or the alcoholic soldier with a shattered mind, who takes the sunnyside option for some peace to find.

Well, that's my victory, but no one knows. For it's deep in my mind where nobody goes.



Mountain-top pilgrimage: 'a physical test and fitting reminder of 1982'

AROUND 40 local residents and veterans, with varying degrees of hangovers from the Royal British Legion dance the night before, gathered on Wireless Ridge on Saturday morning looking anxiously at the weather and at the long stretches of open countryside before then.

Fortified by a prayer and blessing from the Rev Kathy Biles the intrepid band set off, heading for Mount Longdon and the first service of the mountain-top pilgrimage organised to commemorate the battles fought around Stanley twenty-five years ago. There the group met relatives of two Paras who had fallen on Longdon and after prayers they joined them to walk down to Two Sisters Gate. Welcome refreshments, provided by Kelper Stores and the Sea Cadets, awaited the walkers on the Moody Brook track, together with the chance for those with busy days ahead (or just sore feet) to grab a lift back to Stanley.

They were also joined by a group from Stanley House, who made the most of their youth. (and the fact they had not been dancing until the small hours) to charge ahead and lead the way up over Goat Ridge and onto Mount Harriet.

Meanwhile a small splinter group of keen and fit pilgrims added on a detour over Two Sisters – enlivened by a close up view of a spectacular bogging which the rest could only follow through binoculars. Lunch on Mount Harriet was followed by another short service before beginning the final leg of the journey to Tumbledown for closing prayers.

Organiser Louise Taylor said the weather was kind and gave the group the opportunity not only to push themselves physically but to remember the sacrifices of twenty-five years ago: "We remembered the bravery of so many on the hillsides where we can now walk freely." She added: "We would like to thank all those who came along or offered vehicle support. Kelper Stores and the Sea Cadets for the chocolate bars and drinks and the ministers of the Stanley churches for composing and writing the prayer services."

Friends reunited after 25 years

LYNDA Cash was on the aircraft carrier *Invincible* as Leading Medical Assistant in charge of the operating theatre in 1982.

When HMS *Glamorgan* was hit on June 12 and the wounded were taken to the ship, Kevin Smith was among them and severely wounded.

Lynda said it was normal to deal with the wounded and then get them off the *Invincible* as quickly as possible, however Kevin was so poorly he was unable to be moved for quite some time.

Kevin and Lynda both made the pilgrimage to the Falklands this week and were excited to meet up again. "It's been really therapeutic for both of us," she said.

There are five of Kevin's shipmates from the *Glamorgan* in the Islands this week and everyone has been extremely supportive throughout the visit, Lynda said.

Although Kevin survived, his best friend who was also taken onto *Invincible* did not and he passed away in Lynda's arms.

This has been difficult for both of them to live with.

Lynda explained: "If he had lived we may have operated on him first which would have delayed Kevin's operation and he might not have made it."



Glamorgan survivors plan new memorial

WHEN the *Glamorgan* was hit by an exocet launched by the Argentines from the back of Stanley. 14 of the crew died.

There is no memorial to the ship on the Islands but survivors visiting this week have pin pointed a site they would like to erect one, providing permission can be obtained.

At a site overlooking the sea near Hookers Point, the plan is to place a two foot celtic cross with a bench.

1982 crew member Mark Gentry, who is now a civilian instructor with the Royal Navy and a member of the HMS *Glamorgan* Association said: "It's such a tranquil spot to sit and reflect and incorporates our hunting ground."

The pilgrimage was Mark's first time back to the Islands and he said he was exhausted but added: "It's a nice exhausted."

Workshop looks at Steeple and Grand Jason management

THE best way to manage Steeple and Grand Jason was the topic of dicsussion at a workshop held earlier this month.

Representatives from the tourism industry, the military, Falkland Island and South Georgia governments, environmental scientists. and local landowners from some of the western islands attended the workshop, held on November 2 Wildlife Conservation Society, the owners of Grand and Steeple Jason. were represented by Graham Harris. the Southern Cone project co-ordinator, and Avecita Chiccion, the Latin American co-ordinator based in their New York office.

The workshop explored several themes relating to threats to the islands' wildlife, both through current and potential future pressures. and how management and research priorities might be best outlined to better support sustainable use of the islands. Discussions took place over guidelines for tourist usage, and how this and other initiatives could support better education and access for local residents.

Isaac Forster, the Albatross and Petrel programme co-ordinator for Falklands Conservation, said that the contributions from all the participants resulted in a successful and satisfying day. He commented: "Our

thanks go to Sealed PR for their excellent organisation, Graham and A vecita for making the journey down and to all who devoted their time to attend the meeting.

Prior to the workshop Isaac headed out to Grand Jason for three days with Rebecca Upson, the Plant Conservation Officer for Falklands Conservation, to carry out a vegetation survey.

As is the case on Steeple Jason, the largest areas of tussac are found along the south/ southwestern coastline, which also holds the largest seabird colonies. In other areas there was evidence of reasonably large areas having burnt out in the past

Contrastingly, areas of semiimproved grassland dominated the coastal areas on the north side of the island, a clear sign of the historical sheep-grazing that is now ap-preciated by large populations of geese. The hillside slopes were dominated by dwarf shrub heath, that was interspersed with dark patches of small fern, pure blue-green Fuegian couch, and cinnamon grass, which filled the air with its characteristic intense aroma.

Isaac reported that a total of 43 plant species were identified, of which II species were non-native.

He commented: "A number of different lichens and bryophytes were also present, forming the dominant ground cover on some higher ground and inland rock sites. Five of the 13 endemic species were recorded with the surprisingly frequent lady's slipper and the delicate native yellow violet adding welcome splashes of colour. Woolly and smooth ragworts and the vanilla daisy were all poised to spring into bloom. Other notable sights were the large areas covered almost entirely with the endemic cushion plant coastal nassauvia, which we only see in relatively small patches around the Stanley area, and the finding of several flowering individuals of the rare whitlow grass."

Overall, Isaac said, the trip gathered solid baseline data in line with the habitat map already available for Steeple Jason and more is now known about the plant life on the island. He said: "Repeat surveys will allow us to see how the vegetation continues to develop since grazing was halted in 1968 and can contribute toward the Jasons' management plan."

Greasy wool prices increased in Australia this week across the micron spectrum, with the largest increases in the 22 to 23 micron range. Markets in South Africa and New Zealand were unchanged or slightly up for the week.

The easing of the value of the Australian dollar against the Pound however; has caused the reduction in p/kg from last weeks value, except in the 22 and 23 micron categories, as shown in the "Micron Price Guide" table below. The AWEX "Eastern Market

Indicator" (EMI) finished at 422.5 pence per kilogram clean, down 4.9 pence compared with last weeks 427.4p/kg

Good clearance rates in South Africa and Australia have shown the continued interest from buy-

Your questions answered

Q FIG has announced that Cable and Wireless will be given the exclusive right to provide Camp telecoms with considerable financial assistance from FIG.

It is widely know that there were alternative proposals made to FIG from the private sector which may have been considerably cheaper and been in place faster.

Will FIG adhere to its promised policy of publishing the details of all tenders, including prices, for public information? If there are substantial differences will FIG please explain the reasons for their decision?

Councillor Mike Summers provided the following information.

A C&W already has the exclusive right (and obligation) for a further five years to provide telephone services to Camp. FIG has signed heads of agreement with C&W to extend the life of that service and to considerably enhance the deliverable content to include broadband for an extension of seven years to the license agreement.

The alternative offered to deliver services to camp by VSAT. Whilst it is possible, but not entirely clear, that the capital costs would have been less, all calls including local calls would have been satellite calls, and very expensive. The Government was not satisfied that the alternative offered was sufficiently developed to constitute an offer that could be pursued with the confidence that would be necessary to put this vital service in the hands of a supplier with little experience in this area.

Furthermore the alternative system would have required either agreement from C&W that it would relinquish camp phones as part of its business, or agreement that it would carry the traffic of another provider, or the alternative provider to also provide the Stanley system including mobile, broadband and fixed line services. No offer was made in this last respect, and there was no evidence that the provider had made any arrangements with C&W in the former.

FIG would be happy to publish the tender of the unsuccessful provider if they so request, and will along with C&W publish full details of the proposed system when contracts are signed.

Telecommunications is one of

the vital lifelines of the whole community. both in Stanley and in camp. FIG needs full confidence that any provider has the technical ability, the negotiating clout of a major supplier with satellite providers, the financial resources to undertake and support a full telecomms system that requires major capital investment, and the ability to continue to develop the system in a fast moving world. We have taken full cognisance of these factors in determining how best to proceed.

Q IS it true that one or more camp airstrips may be operating without adequate fire cover due to fire and emergency equipment being out of date?

If so, are all involved parties aware of this? Who would be held responsible if an accident occurred and the equipment malfunctioned?


Director of Civil Aviation, Andrew Newman replied to this question.

A The equipment currently in use is considered adequate and is serviced annually as per the manufacturer's recommendations, training is also carried out at this time. An additional operating inspection and training is carried out between services.


The manufacturer's servicing schedule requires that in addition to the annual service periodic visual checks are carried out on components, this is carried out at the interim six month check. Additionally the licensee of the airstrip is required under the conditions of the licence to ensure the equipment is kept fit and ready for turnout. The aerodrome manual also

The aerodrome manual also contains operating instructions and system checks for the fire equipment. This manual should be available to the licence holder and anyone operating the airstrip on his/ her behalf. The licensee is also responsible for reporting any defects to the Director of Civil Aviation, who is ultimately responsible for assessing camp airstrip compliance with regulatory requirements.

The aerodrome licensee has responsibilities for the fire equipment and all other conditions of the aerodrome licence. FIG provide the servicing and training element to the licensee and other persons operating the airstrip through the Stanley Fire and Rescue Service.

New Year by-election Government apologises for poor advice after Dr Davies vacates seat

THE government has apologised for an error which lead to the Legislative Council seat occupied by Dr Richard Davies becoming vacant.

A by-election will take place on January 3 and Dr Davies intends to seek re-election for the Stanley constituency. He gained the highest number of votes in the 2005 election.

Dr Davies, who also works part time as a General Practitioner at the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital, lost his seat after acting as Chief Medical Officer (CMO) in the absence of the substantive CMO, something which is unconstitutional - despite being advised by the government that he was safe to fill the role.

In June 2006 he signed a new contract which required him to act in the capacity of CMO if requested. Dr Davies said he was uneasy about this in view of the potential conflicts of interest, and he raised the issue with his managers.

He commented: "It was agreed that I should confine myself as far as possible to clinical matters such as making decisions about calling out an air ambulance. I did not attend HMSC or senior management team meetings. Nevertheless there were sometimes issues of policy or recruitment which I was uncomfortable dealing with. On these occasions I raised the matter with either the Director of Health or the Chief Executive and strove to negate any conflict of interest in this way."

On three occasions in the last two years Dr Davies had been required by the medical department to act as CMO in the absence of Dr Diggle. On Friday he was advised by the Attorney General that this was unconstitutional and that in so doing he had vacated his seat in Legislative Council.

This week Dr Davies said he had taken independent legal advice which had corroborated this view: "The law does not appear to allow for any discretion."

He said this was contrary to the advice he previously received from government: "I was informed that it was permitted, as a councillor, to fill in as Acting CMO during the



Chief Medical Officer's absence."

Dr Davies said he accepted the advice of his managers and the former Chief Executive in good faith: "If they had sought appropriate legal advice a simple solution could have been devised to fulfill the service need of the department in a constitutional manner. The present problem would not have ansen."

Current Chief Executive, Dr Michael Blanch, described the events as "a bad error" for which the government had apologised. In an interview with Falklands Radio he said the problem appeared to stem from the former Chief Executive Chris Simpkins and/or the then Attorney General, Melanie Chilton, relying on an internal document called the Management Code.

He explained: "This is a document that brings together all the law of provisions on how we handle people management in the civil service. The Management Code was not specific about the matter of acting posts. It is well known that a person can't be a substantive Chief Medical Officer and hold appointment as a councillor - the Management Code wasn't clear.

Man jailed for assaulting child

A TWENTY-FOUR year old man who admitted a sexual offence against a child under 13 began a six month prison sentence on Tuesday.

Leroy John Young had already spent eight weeks in custody when he appeared before the Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson for sentencing. His case had been adjourned for a pre-sentence and psychological report to be prepared.

Defence counsel David Lang said it was "startlingly clear" from the psychologist's report that Mr Young, although 24 years old, was not intellectually a person of the same age.

He added that the victim had suffered as a result of the incident but that Mr Young was not solely responsible for her suffering. "It is inevitable in a small community that she has been identified despite all the precautions; her identity has been bandied about and she has suffered as a result," he said. Miss Thompson said that the

Miss Thompson said that the sentence should be a deterrent for not only Mr Young but also for the public at large. She said that while she was satisfied Mr Young did not intend to harm the girl, he should have considered her age: "No child of that age has the emotional maturity to cope with such a situation."

Miss Thompson was "disappointed and disgusted," at the attitude some had shown towards the victim, and added that the girl should not feel in any way to blame for what had happened.

St Helenian-born Mr Young will reappear in court on November 28 when applications for a Sexual Offenders Protection Order (SOPO) and Deportation Order will be made by the Crown.

IF anyone had said to me a week ago that we would be facing a by-election in the New Year, 1 would have politely suggested they needed their head examined.

For there we were, in the midst of marking the second anniversary of the 2005 election and asking councillors to identify their aims for the remaining two years, confident that they would see it through to the end of their term. (We do hope the fact Dr Davies' answers are in this week's edition - the pages were set before the news broke - will not confuse readers too much.)

However, as British Liberal politician Joseph Chamberlain once said, "In politics there is no use looking beyond the next fortnight."

And so now we need to set the wheels in motion for the by-election. Next week *PN* will print the relevant details for the publication of manifestos - the deadline for submission is likely to be December 7 so, candidates, please start thinking about what you wish to say.

Understandably, some people have asked why a bit of discretion wasn't exercised in this case and Dr Davies allowed to continue in office - after all, they argued, this was the fault of the government, not of Richard. Why punish him for this oversight? Why waste public money on a by-election, which is likely to cost up to £7,000?

But this approach goes against what the public has demanded for years - transparency. If the problem had been pushed under the carpet when it was discovered not only would the government be guilty of acting unconstitutionally but also of corruption. The by-election may seem a waste of time and money to some but it must be the right thing to do.

As for who should be held to account for this blunder, it seems unlikely this will be fully resolved. Dr Blanch is clearly of the opinion - and it is only opinion - that either the previous Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins, or the previous Attorney General. Melanie Chilton, appeared not to have looked at the provisions in the Constitution.

We would have to consider the exact circumstances in which they gave any advice, including the other pressures on them at the time, the questions they were asked and the advice that they gave."

While there will inevitably be calls for an investigation, it would mean even more cost to the taxpayer and, as Mr Blanch says, there is insufficient evidence to begin with. It's an unsatisfactory outcome but do we have any other choice but to learn from the experience and move on?

Digital TV proposals coming soon

INFORMATION on the proposed new BFBS digital television services will soon be released to the public.

'Urgent' improvement needed at FICS Can recycling

THE Falkland Islands Community School (FICS) is not performing as well as it should, a school inspector has found.

Overall achievement and standards were deemed as unsatisfactory and too little notice is taken of students' prior achievements before they enter FICS, with an over-reliance on non-statutory testing. However, the school is doing well in art, music, PE and some aspects of English and Science.

Reporting on his inspection carried out late last month. Mike Chislett from Service Children's Education said the need for improvement at FICS was "urgent" and he recommended an interim review of the school's progress be held in a year's time.

By contrast, Stanley's Infant and Junior School and the Camp Education Service fared much better in the inspection, with both being deemed "effective" by Mr Chislett, with "satisfactory" standards and achievement, and teaching and learning never classed as less than satisfactory, with some "good" and "outstanding" practice.

The report acknowledged the period of disruption in leadership and management experienced at FICS in recent years and that GCSE results in 2007 were higher than in 2006. However, Mr Chislett said many students could and should do better

Overall achievement and standards were deemed unsatisfactory at the end of both key stages, however some good, even exceptional, achievements were noted during the inspection.

Mr Chislett said the school's new headteacher Alistair Baldwin had lost no time, supported by staff, in gaining an understanding of the strengths and weaknesses of the school's work in order to make improvements. He commented: 'Much has been done to reverse the



school's fortunes in that time. (Mr Baldwin's) deliberately high profile has ensured that confidence in the school is maintained.

The inspector deemed student behaviour at FICS as unsatisfactory overall, with learning time being lost for others in too many lessons. However, he added: "The decline is being reversed and firm and compassionate measures are being put into place. A very good start has been made on understanding the quality of teaching and learning throughout the school, in order to support its future development."

In a statement released this week, Director of Education Barbara Booth said there were "no surprises" in the inspection reports and the proposed restructure of the Education Service was designed to address many of the development areas which had been identified. She said: "Initial plans are already in place to make the necessary improvements.'

At a meeting of the Education Board held on Tuesday, Mrs Booth said it was always easy to dwell on the negatives in inspection reports, rather than the positives. She commented: "Good things can be over-looked. With regard to teaching and learning, in inspection-speak when it says it is satisfactory this means it is a cause for satisfaction a job well done.

"In all three reports, teaching and learning is overall satisfactory. At FICS in teaching and learning there is some good and very good practice."

Mrs Booth said the education department, in conjunction with the staff from the schools will together take the necessary steps to ensure that all children receive the highest quality education possible.

As a first step and as a conse-quence of Phase 1 of the restructuring process, she announced the appointment of Mr Richard Fogerty. current supervisor of Camp Education, as Assistant Director of Education.

Mrs Booth said she and Mr Fogerty will work closely in support of the headteachers to implement improvement plans for the education service.

FANS of recycling living in the Falklands will be delighted to hear the plans of one Stanley resident.

With assistance from the Development Corporation. Octavio Marinovic Dey's is establishing a business recycling aluminium cans. called Clean Planet

Octavio gained his experience and contacts from previous employment in his native Chile; he has approached companies there who expressed an interest in buying compressed cans for recycling.

Cans currently end up in land fill and take centuries to biodegrade. which has obvious environmental implications. He plans to collect and compact the cans into crates and they will then be shipped in 25 tonne containers to Chile by the purchasers.

He is to meet with representatives of the Public Works Department next week to discuss his plans and will then make a presentation to the Chamber of Commerce.

Lyn Buckland of FIDC said the public's assistance is needed for the project to work: "For this venture we are asking people not to throw away their drinks cans, or to throw them out with their normal rubbish at this stage, and we are asking people to change what they do with their rubbish.

"Likewise we do have to try to convince local publicans that they could have separate bins, one for bottles (for the glass imploder) and one for Clean Planet."

Change to FIPASS charges

CHARGES for the use of reefer containers at FIPASS are to be increased. The current charges date back to 1999 and most have changed very little, if at all, since then.

A paper from the FIPASS managers Byron McKay Port Services was presented to the Fisheries Committee on Tuesday suggesting an increase from £6.80 per day for a 20-40 foot container to £11 to reflect the actual cost of electricity used.

The cost of water will be increased to £4.50 (from £4) in normal working hours and from £4.50 to £5 out of hours. These costs are hoped to be implemented on January 1, 2008.

While the committee agreed to the increases, a paper has to go to Executive Council for them to be approved.



Fisheries: Ban looms on high seas bottom trawling

THE proposal for a ban on high seas bottom trawling has caused some concern among members of the fishing industry.

The issue was considered in the Fisheries Committee in June 2006 and was originally proposed for places such as vulnerable deepwater areas and seamounts.

The United Nations General Assembly Resolution 61/05 calls upon regional fisheries management organisations to regulate bottom fisheries and adopt measures for a precautionary and ecosystem approach within international law as a matter

Councillor Andrea Clausen explained that the ban was inevitable: "If we wish to continue to fish in these areas we have to make a case that we are not endangering any of the vulnerable areas. To this end we have to produce a case so that whenever the relevant monitoring body seeks to ascertain our actions and position we are ready.'

A report is to be compiled by

that we as a government have to take prior to January 1, 08 and if we do, these will be communicated to the industry accordingly." said Cllr Clausen.

Those countries that are party to an RFMO (Responsible Fisheries in the marine ecosystem) are provided with an extra year's grace, however the Falklands are not in this position, Cllr Clausen said.

She commented: "This is due to a lack of willingness to progress the establishment of an RFMO by our neighbour."

No religious education classes in school

RELIGIOUS education is not to be introduced to Falklands schools. Instead, comparative studies of the major world religions will be taught.

The idea of introducing religious education was requested by a parent and presented by Councillor Janet Robertson at a meeting of the Board of Education last month.

At the Board's latest meeting, held yesterday, the Director of Education, Barbara Booth, said analysis of the 2006 Census data showed that of those born in the Falklands, 36 per cent declared they had no religion, as opposed to 31 per cent of those born in the UK and 12 per cent of those born in St Helena.

Mrs Booth therefore recommended that the schools be encouraged to provide an element of comparative studies which take account of the major world religions through the personal, social and health education programmes, but do not introduce religious education focused upon one particular faith

Your questions answered

Q CAN statements made by one person about another person, or group of people on an internet chat site that cause offence be termed malicious gossip, or libel, and therefore be prosecuted under Falkland Islands law?

A Principal Crown Counsel, Ros Cheek, kindly answered this question.

Defamatory libel may be prosecuted under Falkland Islands law. Case law would suggest that publication on the internet constitutes publication for the purpose of the law.

However, English law has deter-

mined that, whilst a prosecution for libel is not necessarily a breach of Article 10 of the European Convention on Human Rights (the right to freedom of expression), the restrictive regulations of criminal libel should only be applied where it is really necessary in the particular case

The same restraint would apply in the Falkland Islands, where freedom of expression is protected under section 10 of the Constitution.

An individual who is aggrieved by an alleged libel may wish to take advice in relation to the civil law relating to libel.

Police chief on retired UK officers: 'Feedback is overwhelmingly positive'

THE three retired police officers who were recruited to join the Falklands force for three months are achieving the aims they were set with, the Chief of Police has said.

Superintendent Paul Elliot said the three were recruited to provide resilience to the Falklands police force, to enable it to operate during a period of severe staff shortage, and to provide mentoring and tutoring to existing and new recruits. He commented: "This has been and still is being achieved."

Three local officers are currently in the second week of a five-week classroom-based course, who will "go live" when the British bobbies, return to the UK on December 18.

The UK officers have provided valuable "on the beat" training and mentoring to the regular and many reserve police constables by simply sharing their practical police experience, Superintendent Elliot said.

rience, Superintendent Elliot said. He explained: "This includes sitting in on interviews, defusing public order offences, dealing with crimes and anti-social behaviour, sharing investigatory skills and developing good community engagement techniques across all sections of the public – young and old.

"They have also provided independent feedback to me and to my Sergeants with ideas of how some aspects of policing could be improved."

As well as being high profile in Stanley they have also occasionally been deployed on Camp patrol. The Chief of Police was quick to assert these trips were not "jollies". He commented: "I am saddened that some local people consider police visits to Camp as jollies.

"Feedback from people in Camp received so far has been overwhelmingly positive. They appreciate the fact that police officers (local and retired officers) have been out of Stanley. We are after all the Royal Falkland Islands Police – not the Stanley City Force." DARE training

A fourth UK-recruited officer, PC Donald Morrison from the Orkney Islands, has taken on the police liaison officer role for the Community School and will be presenting

the DARE programme to pupils there. This may mean he will require training, and some people have said this money should be spent on a local officer. Superintendent Elliot com-mented: "If he is to be fully used during his two year (extendable) contract surely he should be able to undergo training whether in the UK or locally sourced? PC Morrison is making a huge investment of his time, experience and energy in the Falklands. Whilst I am in command of the Royal Falkland Islands Police, I have a duty and reserve the right to invest in him and all of my officers to provide a high value, professional policing service to the Islands." Another officer who is likely to be DARE trained is from the Falklands, Superintendent Elliot said.

While acknowledging that it was good to invest in people who were in the Islands long term – he said that did not always work.

He commented: "Two of my 'long term' local regular officers have recently left the force, one for a job in the UK another for a job at MPA – was RFIP investment in them value for money or wasted?

"In any case, what does a short term contract mean - many of the people currently living and working in the Islands tell me they only came for a short contract and ended up staying for years." He added, "It these islands are

He added, "If these islands are to have the police force they deserve, then it must be properly trained. That applies to all officers, whether on contract or lifelong residents."

Photographers eye up albatross progress

NATURALIST photographers Ian and Georgina Strange have been flying with albatross, and capturing images of the birds' nesting sites. -The father and daughter duo,


The father and daughter duo, along with Georgina's partner, Dan Birch, took to the air at the end of September to carry out surveys of black-browed albatross colonies, just as work on analysing the 2005 and 2006 aerial photographic survey work of the New Island Nataional trust was being finalised.

Following the same pattern and timing and using the same methodology made over a number of years, their objectives were also the same. Refining aerial photographic survey skills was one aim, a development which can now be used to actually define albatross on new or old nests.

Their other aim was to confirm whether or not this new breeding season in the Falkland Islands had brought back the increasing numbers of potential adult breeding pairs shown by their surveys in the last twenty years.

What of the results? Ian commented: "Three different island sites were surveyed, all being what we would term as medium sized colonies with a total for the three sites of over 55,500 pairs. As shown with the earlier surveys reported on in *Penguin News* in September 2007, the results were interesting.

"One site with a total of some fifteen and a half thousand pairs produced a differential of just 56 pairs from our 2006 survey, indicating a stable situation, or a de-


crease of 0.3% following a natural fluctuation seen in some years.

"One other site gave an increase of 8.7% from last year, the third site produced an increase of 14% over the 2006 survey figures."

He said that when aerial photographs from 2006 and 2007 are compared, there is a clear indication that new sites on these particular islands are being taken by nesting pairs, with older established sites appearing to show little expansion.

Ian added: "What our photographs do show is that the albatross at these three island sites are presently doing well."

Ian, Georgina and Dan said they were grateful to British International Helicopters for their logistical support.



I WOULD like to pass on my personal appreciation for the wonderful reception we had from all the inhabitants of the Falkland Islands on our recent visit.



Spotlight on councillors:

CONTINUING our coverage to mark the second anniversary of the election of Legislative Council on November 17, *Penguin News* questioned councillors on their manifesto pledges and portfolios.

DR ANDREA CLAUSEN (STANLEY)



PN: As a young mother standing for election you were keen to bring in beneficial support for young families.

Some would argue you have failed to progress this over the past two years - have you?

AC: Progress is being made, but far too slowly, there are many interrelated issues that can bring support to families many of which we are having discussions about right now, such as family allowance, and pre-, post- and lunch time provision.

Many of these issues are being picked up by the Child and Youth Strategy Group and the Education Department, neither of which 1 am directly involved in but 1 keep a close eye on progress and lobby hard when I need to. This area remains a very high priority to me and I will endeavour to speed up progress where I can.

PN: You also expressed a wish to improve the apprenticeship situation - you said you would inject emphasis of direction and funding to reverse current trends but can you honestly say this has happened?

AC: There has been a serious overhaul of the appenticeship scheme, inconsistencies between public and private sector apprenticeships have been resolved and we have increased the funding available to this scheme so that in any given year there are a total of 15 apprentice years which should provide a more easily manageable and affordable scheme going forwards.

PN: During the election build up you said increasing the consolidated fund was a priority and improved efficiency was required to ensure operating costs are maintained at an affordable level.

However many people worry that, instead, the government's spending is out of control.

AC: It would be nice to see ways in which we could easily increase the consolidated fund - but unless or until we can identify another significant income stream this will be almost impossible to achieve.

Every year we seek further efficiencies within the public service and although there are still a number of areas where further efficiencies can be made, there are some areas which are now suffering and the level of service is being eroded as a direct result of continuous efficiency savings.

Regarding capital spending, aside from maintenance, we are targeting our spending at projects that either have a direct return such as the wind farm and the heat recovery system, or at areas that can stimulate development such as the ro-ro ferry service and subsequent integrated transport system.

I do believe that we need to take a harder look at some of our transfer payments and I would like to see exit strategies from support schemes that have been established to facilitate change and assure ourselves that the change expected is taking place at an appropriate rate.

PN: What are your priorities for the next two years?

AC: On the financial front I would like to see us set a surplus budget and at the same time maintain essential service levels: in order to achieve this I think we have to work harder at managing expectation.

At the same time I would like to see a reduction in our reliance on the illex licence fee aspect of our annual revenue. I appreciate that this is a tall order but I believe we should be prepared to look at how we can achieve these objectives.

Regarding specific issues I would like to see the completion of the review of the immigration policy and the subsequent implementation of a robust and objective new system: implementation of a ban on smoking in enclosed work and public places; implementation of a completed integrated transport system, including a review of air services; improving the status of our relationship with the EU in particular in relation to trade; implementation of the restructure of the Education Department; and, finally and most importantly, protecting and enhancing the quality of family life in this amazing country that is our home.

RICHARD COCKWELL (STANLEY)



PN: In your manifesto you said: "It is essential to control expenditure at a level which will maintain a steady increase in our consolidated fund." Many would now argue that government's spending is out of control and that expenditure is above our means.

RC: Due to increasing costs it has not been possible to increase the consolidated fund, however the climate has been created for an increase in private sector development and FIG is continuing to investigate in money saving projects such as the wind farm.

PN: Are you satisfied that a close enough eye is kept on spending by departments within PWD?

We all hear stories about simple jobs becoming complicated and expensive because work is sub-contracted out. What is being done to monitor such instances and to stop costs from escalating?

RC: The Director of Public Works has a budget to work to and I am fully confident that he attempts to get 'best value' on all projects.

It is reassuring that the budget overruns which were common in this sector are now rare.

PN: The introduction of the ferry service will place added pressure on the Camp road network.

Only a fraction of the roads are capped - are you confident the roads will stand up to this increased traffic?

RC: This decision was proposed through the Transport Advisory Committee who have the overall control of the road maintenance budget. I support this initiative although I realise that the full benefit of the ferry cannot be realised until all roads are suitable.

Will Constitutional reform result in better scrutiny?

A THEME of the 2005 election was greater openness in decision making, however many voters are concerned councillors are proceeding with a Constitution which will not improve scrutiny.

While most councillors admit more could be done, they insist the new set up will allow increased examination of government business.

Chair of the Select Committee on the Constitution. Councillor Mike Summers, said that during the public consultation on the Select Committee's report there was only minority support for a government/opposition model which would have been likely to produce the most active scrutiny.

He commented: "Instead, the proposed changes to the Constitution foresee the continuation of the system of government in which the Executive Council is the senior body of government, and non-ExCo members remain active in committee work."

In this system, he said, councillors have a number of compromises to make: "Scrutiny is just one of the elements we have to consider in devising a system that works effectively, and gives voters the representation they expect. Annex I of the Report of the Select Committee provides analysis of the issues and potential solutions."

Cllr Janet Robertson felt that within the current Constitution the ability to re-structure elements which could lead to better visible scrutiny of government business are provided.

She commented: "I don't believe that the issue is so much one of a lack of scrutiny, but rather to what extent that scrutiny is visible to the public. I also believe that the issue of scrutiny is not just an issue for councillors, but also for the press and the public at large.

"Monthly public meetings are a good opportunity for members of the public to raise issues; if these meetings are felt not to be frequent enough, or not conducive to proper discussion, then I would welcome hearing about it."

Cllr Richard Davies said the intention had been to set up a structure which would improve scrutiny: "Whether it does depends not just on the details of the Constitution but how we use it."

He said he had argued for an eight member Executive Council (ExCo) in which members would present their committee papers and the others would scrutinise.

He commented: "If ExCo met in public that would allow public scrutiny too. This system has potential drawbacks too: for example no members have a clear 'opposition' role to scrutinise government."

Cllr Andrea Clausen felt scrutiny would be increased under the new Constitution: "As a portfolio holder and a member of Executive Council you will naturally have a better understanding of papers from your portfolio - some could argue that this gives those portfolios an unfair advantage. By removing this we will increase scrutiny."

She commented: "We could have gone further but I think it is sensible to progress by a series of relatively smaller steps."

Two years on, what have they achieved?

PN: What are your priorities for the next two years? RC: Politically I want to see the

RC: Politically I want to see the new Constitution and the new structure of council in place. I want to see new projects and sources of income come on stream from within the private sector.

the private sector. Within my portfolio: further development of wind energy, a fully developed waste management plan, a decision regarding a deep water port, proper plans for the Jetty Centre launch handling and tourist facilities coupled with the Dockyard heritage site.

DR RICHARD DAVIES (STANLEY)



PN: In the election you captured the civil service vote - you sold yourself well to them. What have you actually achieved for the civil service?

RD: Most councillors work in the private sector. I have tried to promote a better understanding of the civil service from an 'insider' viewpoint.

There is a tendency for those in the private sector to see the advantages of working for FIG (relative job security, for example) but not the frustrations (such as an unwieldy, inconsistent and unsatisfactory process of pay and performance review).

Although 1 may not have achieved any dramatic change, 1 believe 1 have helped to provide a more balanced view and better informed decision making. I have been particularly concerned about pay and performance review, recruitment and retention of contract officers, and equal pay for equal work.

I strongly believe that the key for improving employment conditions, both in the public and private sectors, is effective union representation. The Union is widely perceived to be ineffectual. Unless you support it, it will continue to be so.

PN: How successfully do you feel you are fulfilling your duties as doctor and councillor - is either job suffering? Is it really possible to do both?

RD: Many people will be aware that I spend less time in the hospital than previously. I decided to job share before the election, and would have done that whether elected or not. My reduced hospital commitment is due to my choice to reduce my hours. NOT due to my work as a councillor. We have developed a working pattern at the hospital which minimises any clash between medical and council commitments.

Yes, it is possible to be a doctor and a councillor. It is important that we have people from a wide range of backgrounds in council, and that we don't make it impossible for those in work (the majority of the electorate) to stand for election.

I believe I am fulfilling both roles successfully. It has been easier this year as I have become more familtar with my portfolio; 2006 was a steep learning curve.

RD: Many people worry the government's spending is out of control and not being allocated on projects that will show a return - how would you respond? RD: We have to look at social, political and quality of life factors as well as economic ones.

We have several projects which will not show a quick return, and may never do so. The abattoir is an example. The underlying justification is to help maintain a vibrant community in the Camp. No one would argue with that.

I don't know whether the abattoir was the best way to do that, or if I would have supported it at the start. It is unfortunate that sheep numbers and meat prices have been poorer than predicted. However, the fact is we have put a lot of resource into it, and we have encouraged farmers to alter the genetics of their flocks, which is a long term project.

I do not believe in throwing good money after bad, but nor have I been persuaded that we should pull the plug on it. The economic equation is not simple and it should not be forgotten that a significant part of the subsidy does go back into the community.

I don't think spending is out of control; it is one of the most actively scrutinised aspects of government. There are other important projects being considered which may be in the long term interests of the Islands even if they show no quick return. For example, I would support the Historic Dockyard project, and the building of a deep water port, but we need to look at creative ways to finance these.

PN: What are your priorities for the next two years?

RD: More transparency. I believe I have put the Falklands case for self-determination strongly and clearly at the UN. I hope to continue this - it is vital that we get a consistent and clear message across. Our case is much stronger than Argentina's, but it needs to be put across at every opportunity. We need to get the message across in South America too.

Not trying is not an option. South Americans understand about justice and self-determination and are ready to listen, but they only hear Argentina's message. In two years time we need to have developed a clear strategy for PR in South America.

There is likely to be some change in the portfolio structure at next Legislative Council. I hope to continue with my current portfolio responsibilities.

In two years I would like to see a firm start to the historic dockyard project, better protection for our heritage through effective town planning, and better care of our environment. This is important for our quality of life and for tourism.

IAN HANSEN (CAMP)



PN: In your manifesto you suggested lower telephone tariffs should be charged to people living in Camp - this happened for a month or two but that was it.

Why aren't you still actively campaigning for this? How can business in Camp expect to grow without reliable modern communications?

IH: Councillors are collectively negotiating with Cable and Wireless a better deal for the Camp as a whole. This includes broadband and the possible add on of mobile phones. Subsequent tariffs will be scrutinised closely by councillors with the help of [telecommunications consultant] Chris Doyle.

It is certainly not my intention, (nor I believe other councillors) to disadvantage people living in the Camp with regard to tariffs. In the past Cable and Wireless have indicated that if Camp tariffs were to be lower then they would have to pick up the cost elsewhere. Would those currently enjoying a better service than the Camp be prepared to pay more to subsidise the Camp system? I doubt this.

Business in Camp cannot grow without a real investment in modern communications.

PN: The measures to assist farmers introduced last year included a one year holiday from interest on mortgages. What did these measures actually achieve in practical terms for farmers?

1H: Savings made on the holiday interest gave farmers a bit of breathing space to be able to invest some money into projects on farm. The farmers I have spoken to

The farmers I have spoken to about this, who accepted the proposal (and there were those who did not) said they were able to purchase machinery, for instance, that they would otherwise not have been able to buy. Others I am sure will have used the extra savings in their budget for on farm use.

PN: Where are we now with the FLH Recovery Plan? Have targets have been met and what are the priorities for FLH now?

IH: You will have seen the ExCo paper submitted by FLH. The targets for micron reduction, and a better lambing percentage are meeting the demand asked. Sale of disposable assets are also on line as requested.

Priorities for FLH are now to continue to reduce micron, produce more lambs overall, and be able to supply Sand Bay with the throughput required - and of course become self funding.

PN: During the election you called for more investment in tourist industry - particularly to build up land-based tourism and you are now the chair of the Tourist Board. What have you managed to achieve for tourism? Why is FITB forced to justify its expenditure to such a degree?

IH: I have always believed that a leap of faith to invest in tourism without justification for expenditure is a fairly low risk gamble given the global trend with tourism. Admittedly I have had problems in being able to express to Standing Finance Committee the need for investment on this particular issue.

However it is understandable that other portfolio holders should request justification given that they are under pressure to produce funding for their departments.

PN: Some feel the government is wasting funds on projects that will not show a return - how do you see it?

IH: If the reference is to the ferry heads on East and West then I would argue for my constituency that there is a potential return. If the reference is to the abattoir then I would also argue that the return to farmers (while acknowledging that it is an indirect subsidy) is worthwhile.

Do the biggest drains on government funds, ie Health and Education, show a return? It has to be a fine balancing act between investment and quality of life.

PN: What are your priorities for the next two years? To continue to support devel-

Post-war immigrant travels 8,000 miles to find 'God's Own Country'

THE Falklands was probably not the most attractive place to emigrate to in the latter part of 1982, however the stories 19-year-old Lucy Ellis had heard about the Islands' way of life were enough to tempt her to make the journey which shaped the next 25 years of her life.

Arriving on the Norland, the Isles of Scilly native was one of a small group who had decided to make the move: Some stayed - including Lucy and later her brother and parents - others didn't.

Before her arrival in the South Atlantic. Lucy had few preconceptions about the Islands: "I hadn't a clue really what to expect - I just knew it was big, quite rugged and probably quite archaic

"I arrived with eyes wide open and my brain half empty, " she joked.

Stanley was in a terrible mess from the war when she arrived and heaving with military personnel. After 10 days she set off for Port Stephens in the south of West Falklands to take up her job of navvy, one of the less sought after roles on a Falklands' farm.

Lucy recalled: "It was a cracking November day and as the view of the settlement and surroundings spread out in front of me 1 thought it was gobsmackingly beautiful - just awesome.

After about four months of fixing fences, painting anything that didn't move and other menial tasks she was taken on as a shepherd: "There's no doubt that is the best job I have ever had," enthused Lucy. In the early 1980s to be a shep-

herd was considered to be the coolest position to hold on a farm. At Port Stephens there was a particularly enthusiastic group of horsey people and to Lucy this was sheer heaven.

Horses were used for work, gathering sheep from the vast Camps but were also a source of pleasure and were trained for racing, gymkhana and as transport to other settlements. Lucy explained: "There were only a couple of vehicles then and so if you didn't ride it was mainly tractor and sleigh for social functions, of which there were many

She added: "Port Stephens was always a very sociable settlement with the Manager Peter Robertson and his wife Ann organising picnics, barbecues and dances. On these occasions the entire population would up-sticks and head to a local beauty spot for the day.

Particularly at Christmas when there would be visitors from all around. During the festive season all the single people were invited to the big house for dinner which was always very good fun and hugely appreciated."

In those days, not only did Lucy have to adapt to a new environment, but she also took on what was largely considered to be a man's job - there were few females working on farms in full time positions and even fewer who had made such a gutsy move out of what Lucy describes as "pure nosiness" and made a go of it.

It was an early morning start every day and with Port Stephens being such a vast area to cover there were many weeks spent around outside-houses gathering and tending to the sheep.

They were roughly-loughly hving conditions with few basic comforts and the days were long covering the huge camps with a gang of no more than six or seven at any one time.

Facilities were so basic that occasionally essential calls of nature were taken care of behind a grass bog. Snorting with laughter Lucy, recalled how this little operation didn't always pan out (pardon the pun). On one sheep gather a fellow shepherd held back from the gate to relieve himself and then found himself in the unfortunate position of having no tissues. Not a problem for the resourceful - the sleeve of his shirt was promptly removed and served the purpose perfectly.

Thinking he had dealt with the situ-

ation splendidly he returned to the gang but couldn't find his dog. After much whistling Lion appeared over the hill with the shirt sleeve firmly plastered to his coat causing the shepherd gang to scatter in all directions amid peals of laughter!

There's no doubt that Peter Robertson, a forward thinking manager at the time who was always well respected by his gang, had misgivings about Lucy's abilities in the early days. While filling the shearing shed with

full woolled sheep for shearing with Peter for the first time she was amazed to find a pen full of clippies (shorn sheep). "What the hell are they?" she asked," I didn't know you had goats too!

Peter later told Lucy that in her early days as a shepherd her only saving grace was her enthusiasm.

There was no lack of this in any area for Lucy - she was soon right at the heart of sports meetings and other social functions on West Falklands. taking part in horse racing and winning many races on Nuteracker her favourite horse.

Joined by Diane Towersey in 1983 and by Janet Robertson (when she was back in the Islands from her study), the three would ride the 40+ miles from Port Stephens to Fox Bay and beyond for the annual sports meetings and take part in as many events as possible. Ann and Peter would bring up the rear in the Land Rover carting provisions, picking up the pieces and on occasion confiscating the rum bottle if the stops to 'warm-up' began to get too out of hand!

By 1983 motorbikes and two-metre sets were gradually being intro-duced, but at Port Stephens the shepherds had to prove their ability with horses, dogs and sheep husbandry skills before they made the transition to bike shepherd, or "gasoline cowboy" as they were fondly known.

This brought with it an entirely new aspect to the job and some of the ground to be covered was terrifying, Lucy said, however she soon loved motorbikes as much as horses. But as always, there were a few lessons to be learned

After training around the paddocks she was let loose on a sheep job to gather up rams with fellow shepherd Roy Smith. Having successfully completed the task, Lucy turned for home and approached a deep ditch. It was

usual for two strategically placed planks of wood to be used as Rover bridges" and as it got nearer and nearer she experienced a rare "blonde moment" and couldn't decide on what plank to cross. Her oohs changed to aahs as she missed both completely, burying the front wheel firmly into the opposite bank but clear ing the ditch perfectly herself.

Meanwhile subdivision of farms was the latest initiative to reduce the amount of absentee landowners and while this was embraced in some areas, most at Port Stephens were not keen to lose their close-knit community and the security it provided.

However in 1988 while Lucy was overseas she received a letter from Ann Robertson telling her that Port Stephens was to be divided into five sections to each carry 10,000 sheep a number that was considered to be viable after earlier subdivisions struggled on three- to five-thousand strong units Lucy admits that she howled into a Norwegian beer at the news.

The sections were purchased by people who lived on the settlement and Lucy stayed on the farm working for each individual farm when and i



needed

With a drop in wool prices and work becoming more scarce in the area there were times when she also worked on the outer islands of Weddell, New Island and West Point as well as farms in the Fox Bay area.

Lucy had bought a house in the settlement and lived a simple lifestyle but eventually, much to her dismay she reached financial break-point and she had to make the decision to move away from what remains her favourite place in the world.

"I was on the bones of my arse and quite happy, but could no longer make ends meet even with what had become a very frugal lifestyle."

Work was being offered in Stanley and the decision to move was made.

but it was not an easy one, she said. Not one to sit around and mope Lucy knew she needed to make some fast money so took on one of the best paying jobs available at the time - as a fisheries observer for Consolidated Fisheries Ltd on the longliner Isla Guafo.

For Lucy this was a move, "from God's Own Country to hell on earth," in one huge step when she discovered she had no sea legs or a stomach for life on the ocean wave and was sick almost every day of the five weeks she was onboard

While she stepped ashore clutching the biggest pay packet she'd had in a long time she had also lost a dangerous amount of weight: "It was definitely going to be terra firma for me from there on in," she said.

Her work for the next couple of years included cleaning squid (on

FIPASS, - less bobbing about) road building, farm sitting (back to her roots) and temporary stud flock man-ager on Sea Lion Island after Diane Betts, the permanent manager, was unfortunate enough to contract Orf from the newly imported sheep. In 1997 a job as Agricultural As-

sistant with the Department of Agri-culture came up and Lucy's application was successful.

The work was of a practical nature and initially consisted of grass separation for Agronomist Aidan Kerr.

Work was under way to establish the experimental farm at Saladero where the National Stud Flock was by this time residing and was later joined by the National Beef Herd.

Before the Beef Herd could be set up there was the task of removing all cattle from Keppel Island - this was not a job for the faint hearted and involved rounding up what was essentially a wild herd and shipping them off the island via seatrucks to the

moved

Many of the cows were crippled, Lucy said, because a large number of bulls had bred up, resulting in fighting in the herd. She explained: "While it seemed a waste that a lot of animals were killed, at the time it had pretty much become an animal health issue and needed to be sorted out with all the healthy animals being successfully re-

While it was a dangerous and strenuous task for the entire gang, Lucy was full of praise for the crew of the Tamar who worked well beyond the call of duty. "It couldn't have been accomplished without them," she said.

"It was a fantastic opportunity to visit a particularly inaccessible Island unless you are extraordinarily lucky - I was.'

It was natural progression for Lucy to move on to wool related work, with Doug Cartridge who was the Wool Advisor at the time. This was the area that she had most interest in.

In the early days of Lucy's work in the Department of Agriculture, she felt there was a lack of cohesiveness which

now no longer exists.

"Under the 10 year plan built by Peter Johnston and the forward and clear ability to see the wider picture of Senior Agricultural Advisor Neil Judd, the department now concentrates on the business side and seeing where Falklands farmers fit into the global market," she explained.

Meanwhile, Lucy's life doesn't just revolve around work and she has many interests relating to the natural world

Photography is her main love and with partner Nic Huin she is happy to spend time out in the Camp, "...just appreciating the fantastic colours and wild life that the Falklands have to offer "

She still goes back to her favourite place in the world - Lucy has spent all but one Christmas at Port Stephens since 1982.

With the introduction of roads making Stephens more accessible the attraction of the area being the last great outpost has faded as the entire Islands have opened up.

However the area still has a Tolkein like attraction for Lucy and, she said, contains some of the greatest unexplored areas locally.

"Its just an incredible place with loads still to be found, even for me,"



Pilgrimage 2007 Veterans explore Islands

By John Ferguson IN ADDITION to the many trips to East Falkland battlefields and memorials, approximately 80 veterans and next-of-kin were also able to visit West Falkland and some outer islands. Luckily, the weather was fantastic during most of these visits.

Two flights each were made to Fox Bay and Hill Cove for a total of 20 veterans, some of whom were Scots Guards travelling to Hill Cove having spent the previous night on Mt Tumbledown.

The visitors were hosted by families in the settlements, with an evening meal and social functions in the respective settlement clubs.

There were a number of reunions at Hill Cove, as four of the eight who visited were stationed there after the end of the conflict.

The visitors to Fox Bay were also able to attend a service at the impressive new memorial built by West Falklands residents earlier this year.

Apart from the lively social events staged, some lasting until the early hours, the veterans were able to visit wildlife sites, see sheep shearing and go fishing. One veteran later returned to Fox Bay to continue fishing!

Port Howard

Twenty-four veterans, including men from HMS Ardent and nextof-kin (plus a chaplain from MPA and a bugler from the visiting band) sailed from Port San Carlos on MV Tamar. En route they stopped above the site of HMS Ardent in Falkland Sound.

Here a very emotional memorial service was held, during which the HMS Ardent Association standard was lowered during the last post, followed by the laying of wreaths and a tot of rum was raised to the lads below

On arrival at Port Howard, hosts greeted the visitors with tea, coffee and cakes in the shearing shed, and everyone was able to watch sheep shearing, before tours out of the settlement - they saw a crashed Argentine aircraft and the site where Capt J Hamilton MC (SAS) was killed when his patrol was attacked.



A total of 23 veterans and nextof-kin were flown to Sea Lion Island and Lively Island, by FIGAS and helicopter, particularly to visit the memorials to those killed on HMS Sheffield, which sank off Sea Lion Is and LCU Foxtrot Four (from HMS Fearless), which was attacked near Lively. The Veterans Minister also visited Sea Lion Island, and there was an opportunity for everyone to view some the abundant wildlife.

On return to Stanley, there were tributes to the kindness and assistance provided by hosts and those involved in providing the transport, mirroring their experiences on the East

The term "overwhelmed" has been used by many veterans trying to express how they felt about their whole visit to the Falkland Islands.

Hydra men's gifts to museum

VETERAN Peter 'Jan' Spray presented to the museum a limited edition print of an oil painting he had commissioned of HMS *Hydra* at anchor in Stanley in 1982 immediately after the War.

He was on a visit planned to coincide with the pilgrimage.

The print was signed by some of the Ship's Company of 1982 including Bob Stewart who was a young Lt under training in HMS Hydra in 1982. Bob is now a Captain RN and was appointed Captain HM and Hydrographer of the Navy on October 1. The print was also signed by Rear Admiral Sir David Haslam who was the Hydrographer of the Navy in 1982. Captain John Phillips DSC RE Retd also signed the print as he was carried as a casualty in HMS Hydra during the war.

Other photographs and memorabilia from HMS Hydra were presented to the museum by John 'Joe' Erskine. This material will be included with other material in the Falklands War section of the Museum.

Jan was the Master-at- Arms on HMS Hydra and Joe was a Chief Petty Officer. Jan is currently the Chairman of the Survey Ships Association and Joe is the Secretary. Both are members of the South Atlantic Medal Association 1982 [SAMA (82)] of which Joe is an Executive Committee Member. Joe is also the Welfare Officer of the Falklands Veterans Foundation [FVF] and a Caseworker for the Soldiers, Sailors and Airmen's Families Association - Forces Help [SSAFA -Forces Help] in the Portsmouth Division,

There is a photograph in the museum which shows some people in Navy uniform entering the Post Office for the first time after the war to start the clean up. Joe commented: "Jan and I are

two of these people who spent the day clearing up the horrible mess. The Post Office was a complete mess with the exception of the Philately Department which had remained locked and untouched during the occupation by the Argentine Forces."





Goodbye Explorer Drug arrests

THE environmental effects of the sinking of the cruise ship *Explorer* are being monitored by the Chilean Navy, a spokesman from the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) has confirmed.

The Falklands and the wider world watched with sadness as the pioneering cruise ship sank in Antarctica at the weekend.

Built in 1969, Explorer, nicknamed the Little Red Ship, was the first expeditionary cruise ship ever The vessel sank on Friday built. night after being holed in the Bransfield Strait near the South Shetland Islands.

Her 100 passengers and 53 crew abandoned ship and took to lifeboats. The weather was in their fayour with only light winds, albeit in freezing temperatures.

The International Association of Antarctica Tour Operators (IAATO) co-ordinated the response of other ships in the vicinity and within hours of their evacuation, the passengers and crew were rescued by the Norwegian cruise ship, M/S Nordnorge. They were taken to Chilean and Uruguayan bases on King George Island in Antarctica and eventually flown to Punta Arenas for connecting flights home.

The environmental effects of Explorer's sinking are being regularly monitored. Rob Bowman from the Polar Regions Unit FCO

said the Antarctic Treaty Protocol on Environmental Protection. 1991, requires all activities (including tourism) in Antarctica to be planned to minimise environmental impacts

He said the Explorer is believed to have gone down in waters of between 1,000 - 14,500 metres and that she was carrying around 180 cubic metres of diesel marine fuel oil together with smaller amounts of lubricants and gasoline. He commented: "The latest infor-mation we have (from the Chilean authorities) is that there is a small amount of oil on the surface of the water in the area the vessel sank and that a Chilean vessel is actively trying to disperse this.

"Hopefully, given the location of the incident (some 50 miles from the coast) and the weather conditions immediately afterwards, any environmental impacts will be minimal. Nonetheless the Chileans will continue to monitor the situation.

LESS than a week after the Chief of Police vowed to take any allegations of drug use seriously, three people have been arrested for suspected possession of cannabis.

Two drug 'stop and searches' were conducted in Stanley on Friday evening. A small quantity of a substance believed to be cannabis was recovered from one of the people searched and they were arrested

Enquiries into the offence revealed the identity of a suspect who had supplied the drugs, Superintendent Paul Elliott said. A search warrant was obtained and a small quantity of what was believed to be cannabis was recovered from an address in Stanley. The suspect - now known to be a reserve police constable - was not at home at the time of the search, but was subsequently arrested in the early hours of Saturday morning on suspicion of possession of illegal drugs.

As a result of continuing enquiries the identity of a third suspect was established and search warrants obtained. Another small quantity of a substance believed to be cannabis was recovered from an address in Stanley on Saturday afternoon and a person living there was arrested on suspicion of possession of illegal drugs.

All three arrested people were released on police bail pending a charging decision by the Attorney General's Chambers. The reserve police officer was immediately suspended from the force.

Supt Elliott commented: "These drugs-related arrests come only days after a public meeting where the issue of drug availability was raised by a concerned member of the public

"The Falkland Islands enjoy a virtually drug free society and maintain a zero tolerance policy in respect of drug abuse. These arrests demonstrate the commitment of the police to take information received from the public seriously and to act quickly to deal with suspected offences and offenders involved in drugs or any other criminal activity, no matter their position in the community.

Supt Elliott told Falklands Radio that the people arrested were

"some way down the food chain." He commented: "We haven't got Mr Big yet and we are still looking for the main importer of these illegal substances."

DEREK HOWATT has announced that he will be retiring as Financial Secretary in July next year, after 32 years of service at the Treasury.

The announcement came as the government revealed a new staffing structure for the Treasury, approved at the last meeting of Executive Council, which will increase higher level qualified accountancy posts, and leave more room for career progression. This includes merging the positions of Financial Secretary and Treasurer (otherwise known as Deputy Financial Secre-

tary). The present Treasurer, Keith Padgett, is to be offered appointment to a revised post of Financial Secretary

Looking back on his years at the Treasury, Mr Howatt (pictured) commented: "My stewardship of the public finances has been greatly assisted by the efforts of the will-



ing and efficient staff that have accompanied me over the years and I am very grateful for their support. After presenting 17 budgets it is now time to pass on the leadership of the Treasury to a worthy successor and I have every confidence that Keith will rise to the challenge.

One example this week was criticism from Cllr Stevens about the tone I had used in questioning the Director of Education, which he described as "a little ferocious." Yet some people will feel it didn't go far enough.

Admittedly, the allusion I used in my interview, to the sacking of the England football coach for his failing side, may not be entirely fair but I believe that - just as in private sector companies - managers should be held accountable if their department is deemed to be performing badly.

I take it from comments I have heard around town this week that morale among staff at FICS remains low and they are troubled by the way the situation continues to be handled.

the situation continues to be handled. Small things can cause plenty of bad feeling: the FICS staff had appar-ently only been privy to a draft of the inspection report - not the final report that was released to the public. A FICS pupil seemingly turned up at school with a copy and told a member of staff that it said "You're all rubbish teachers" then offered to copy the report for other members of the class. By contrast, I believe Junior School staff had the opportunity to amend some factual inaccuracies in their draft before it was published.

This episode not only highlights some of the disciplinary challenges the teachers are facing, but it also sums up the frustration they are clearly feeling

I don't know how often the Director of Education visits the schools to meet with the staff - and I do not mean the headteachers but those who spend most of their time in the classroom - but there seems to be a real feeling of resentment and misunderstanding between teachers and the management. As someone on the outside, it looks to me like a lot could be gained through direct communication with those at the sharp end. Perhaps the education councillors could participate in these meetings too?

ON AN entirely separate note, I learned this week that the new signs and viewing platforms at Gypsy Cove by the Environmental Planning Department were put up without planning permission when they should have one through the same channels everyone else has to. They could quite likely be told to pull down the structures down.

It would be a complete waste of time and money but, oh, the irony!

Territories minister to visit

MEG MUNN, the FCO Minister for the Overseas Territories, is to visit the Falkland Islands in the New Year.

She was appointed to her current ministerial post in July 2007, succeeding Lord Triesman.

His Excellency the Governor said Ms Munn is keen to visit the Falklands to understand more fully the issues affecting the Islands and to meet the people here: "Her visit will also help her to prepare for the UK Parliament's Foreign Affairs Committee inquiry into the UK Overseas Territories which gets under way in 2008.

Ms Munn will also host the ninth Overseas Territories' Consultative Council (OTCC) in London on 4-5 December 2007, which will be at-tended by Hon Councillors Mike Summers and Janet Robertson.

The OTCC is an annual meet-ing between UK Ministers and Overseas Territory governmental representatives to discuss the Overseas Territories' relationship with the UK and other policy issues of common interest.

Issues on the agenda include constitutional modernisation, immigration issues, human rights, environment charters and climate change, criminal justice, disaster preparedness, and the UK National Audit Office's recent report on risk management in the Overseas Territories.

Penguin News Education restructure will address FICS failings

THE Director of Education says she did not sit by and watch the Community School (FICS) fail. Instead, Barbara Booth says the restructuring proposals for the Education Department were designed with the goal of improving standards at the school.

As reported in PN last week, Mrs Booth said the inspection report contained "no surprises" however she refuted that she had sat by and watched a deteriorating system get worse.

She commented: "That the school needed to improve and that all schools needed increased management capacity to secure further improvement was the basis of the restructuring proposal. Councillors have begun the process by creating an Assistant Director post and also a Deputy Head Teacher post in the Infant Junior School (IJS) to create increased management capacity."

She added that steps had also been taken to make improvements where possible at FICS, given the interim nature of the school's leadership over the last academic year: "A new behaviour code of conduct was formulated, the provision for Special Educational Needs and transition arrangements between IJS and FICS were strengthened. That there is a need to widen curriculum options to include vocational pathways was also identified as was the need to review overall the curriculum.

"A new secondary national curriculum is scheduled for introduction in September 2008 as is the programme of vocational diplomas. It would not be prudent to change the whole curriculum twice in two years and this is also an exercise which should be undertaken with the substantive headteacher.

Education councillor Richard Stevens said Mrs Booth had not been surprised by the problems identified in the report because she had identified them "a long time ago"

He commented: "In the case of the capacity to improve, our Director of Education identified this weakness and suggested an enhanced management team in the restructuring program, to drive development in monitoring and assessing in learning and teaching.

"Far from sitting back we have been working hard to improve but a process of change takes time."

Last week Mrs Booth announced Richard Fogerty's ap-

Rendell, Clausen and Summers remain on ExCo

THE line up of members on Executive Council will remain unchanged from the past year.

During Legislative Council's meeting last Friday, Councillors Mike Summers, Mike Rendell and Andrea Clausen were all re-elected to serve on ExCo.

Under the new portfolio system adopted last week, the three Executive Councillors will have respective responsibility for Policy and pointment as Assistant Director of Education which she said had been made to improve teaching and learning; this is arguably most needed at FICS - yet Mr Fogerty is to be based at the Junior School.

Mrs Booth said the Assistant Director post will start the process of "additional capacity" and the Director, with support from councillors, will seek to extend that further. She commented: "It is necessary for the Assistant Director to have an office base. Reference was made to IJS as a discussion with the headteacher had taken place. This does not imply that there would not be a base in FICS but rather that that discussion had not yet taken place with the FICS headteacher."

As for why the post awarded to Mr Fogerty had not been widely advertised, Mrs Booth commented: "The post of Assistant Director was filled in accordance with the provisions of the Management Code as part of Phase 1 of the restructuring of the Education Department.

Mrs Booth stressed that the FICS had not been deemed as a failing school. She commented. "The inspection judgement is that it needs to improve, which is very different from a school requiring special measures'

Councillor Janet Robertson added: "We have excellent facilities, and very capable and committed staff. With the required support from the department and from FIG, from the parents and the public at large, I have no doubt that the necessary improvements will happen."

Mrs Booth said the school curriculum contains "much to celebrate", notably in the arts and physical education (PE).

She commented: "The support given by learning support assistants for students with special educational needs (SEN) or for whom English is an additional language is good. Leadership and management is now satisfactory overall, since the arrival of the current substantive headteacher at the start of this term. He has rapidly gained the confidence of staff, parents and students; in this he is well supported by teachers and the school's nonteaching staff.

Mrs Booth said it was too easy to focus on the negatives and overlook the good practice which exists from which the school can develop, "to effect the improvements necessary.

JCR hits rock down south

THE James Clark Ross (JCR) has undergone repairs in Stanley after touching an uncharted rock in Antarctica.

The JCR was expected to leave Stanley yesterday, or today (Friday) at the latest.

On November 17, the JCR touched the rock whilst working near Signy Island. British Antarctic Survey spokes-

person Athena Dinar said that a surveyor from Lloyds inspected the JCR over the weekend and decided that suitable, temporary repairs could be done in Stanley to enable her to operate safely for the rest of the Antarctic season.

The permanent repairs will form part of the ship's scheduled refit in the UK summer in 2008.

Tamar under repair

THE schedule for the coastal shipping vessel Tamar has been suspended until further notice due to essential repairs.

The original plan was to tackle the repairs last week under the direction of the engine manufacturer's engineer but he was delayed indefinitely

"We did consider postponing this task until one was available but an inspection made last week showed that risk of a serious failure had greatly increased," said Tim Cotter from FIDC. "We therefore had no choice other than to commence the repair."

This was a particularly difficult task but the engineers were making good progress, Mr Cotter said.

Cruise season heats up

KHLEBNIKOV will visit Stanley for a passenger exchange on Saturday and Bremen will visit Volunteer Point and Stanley on Monday (with 184 passengers).

Tuesday is one of the busiest days of the season - Infinity (2,450 passengers), Discovery (698) and Norwegian Dream (1,750) will all visit Stanley.

On Thursday it is the turn of Shokalskiv with just 48 passengers.

THE Falklands war exhibition at St Mary's Hall Annex is in danger of closing before the end of the 25th anniversary year if funding is not found to keep it open.

Phil Middleton who re-opened the exhibition for the summer season, said that he was struggling to meet the rent for the hall and encouraged all those interested to visit soon in case he has to close before the end of the year.

Originally opened on April 1, it was kept going through to June to allow the FIG guests in the Islands for Liberation Day, school children and local people a chance to view the exhibition, and many have added to the exhibits with letters, photographs or other memorabilia

The exhibition is a self-funded initiative of Phil's with commemorative covers and medallions created with the help of local artists in an effort to off set the costs of rent and heating.

Updated Plan out early next year

THE latest version of the Islands Plan is due to be released in the New Year.

Councillors have agreed the high level aspirations of the plan and the public service is now working on fleshing out the detail. Councillor Mike Summers revealed last week.

The plan, which will run from 2008 - 2012 does not differ greatly from the last, he said, and contains nine areas of aspiration. Hand in hand with these discus-

Hand in hand with these discussions, councillors have also been discussing their Budget Strategy which will feed into the Islands Plan.

Cllr Summers said that when the new Chief Executive Tim Thoroughood arrives, he will cast a new eye on the way the government conducts its business: "He will see if he thinks there are more efficient and effective ways we can do it."

There are two budget options which are likely to be considered by councillors. Cllr Summers said: "One is to continue by and large as we are but with some adjustments as we go. The other is to adopt a plan to reduce expenditure by half a million pounds a year until we get rid of illex revenue from the projections. This is something we've talked about before and would use illex as a windfall."

He added: "That does then raise a number of serious questions about how we treat the windfall."

How much for TV?

A QUESTIONNAIRE on how much people would be willing to pay to receive digital television from BFBS is now out.

The document outlines the type of service being proposed by the government and asks people how much they are happy to contribute to the cost.

Councillor Mike Rendell said most people seemed to think it was time to start contributing to the cost of television: "I've formed the view from talking to people that there is a general realisation that we've had a really good run for the last twenty-odd years and that probably it is time to put our hands in our pockets."

Government Secretary Peter King said that if people decided they did not wish to contribute to the cost of television, medium wave and FM radio services would continue but he added: "It is inevitable that some money will need to be spent to sustain services in the longer term."



News from Executive Council

Status inconsistencies in the spotlight

COUNCILLORS have been discussing "inconsistencies" with the routes to and categories of Falkland Islands Status (FIS) which "need addressing".

These include:

• Limiting the entitlement to FIS by birth to a person who was born a citizen in the Falkland Islands;

 Removing the possibility of FIS being inherited at a future date by the children of Falkland-born "non-settled" aliens who have subsequently acquired citizenship other than by connection with the Falkland Islands;

• The need to propose a further route to FIS to enable children born outside the Falkland Islands, for example for medical reasons;

• The need to remove the shortcut to FIS by choosing the naturalisation route;

• The possibility of revoking Status should be reviewed and restricted to acts of serious crime;

 Removing the short-cut to FIS by marriage; • Removing the current anomaly where children lose their FIS at 18 and have to apply for it in their own right on reaching that age.

Councillor Mike Rendell said most of these inconsistencies have already been highlighted in the Final Report of the Select Committee on the Constitution, but not all of them.

He commented: "ExCo agreed to approve the changes in principle, but subject to the negotiations that will form part of the Constitutional talks which take place between 11 and 13 December."

C&W broadband packages: 'work in progress'

A PAPER addressing issues related to proposed Cable and Wireless business broadband packages which was presented to ExCo has been referred back to the company for further deliberations. Cllr Rendell would not reveal more as the issue was considered a "work in progress".

POAT rate change agreed for non-residents

AN AMENDMENT is to be made to the POAT (Employees' Deductions) Regulations 1997 to bring POAT deductions for employees who are non-resident in the Falkland Islands for tax purposes in line with the lower rate of income tax.

At the moment these employees have deductions made at 20%, the current lower rate of income tax, but this will increase to 21% on January 1, 2008.

Councillor Rendell explained the decision: "Because these employ-

eed for non-residents ees are present in the Falkland Islands for less than 183 days in any income tax year there can sometimes be difficulties in obtaining completed returns and pursuing any

income tax liabilities. "This amendment reduces the likelihood of a liability arising and in most cases, as the deduction does not take into account any Personal Allowance, the employee would be due a repayment." He added: "It was noted that it

He added: "It was noted that it is up to the employee to claim any repayment due."

Planning issues

THE section of the Planning Ordinance which excludes the Planning Officer from discussions in Executive Council about planning appeals is to be repealed.

ExCo spokesperson, Councillor Rendell said this change should benefit the ExCo decision making process in regard to planning appeals "Particularly in light of the fact that since the Planning Officer has no vote at the Planning and Building Committee she has not been a party to the planning decision that has been appealed."

He said this was a very different position from that of a member of ExCo who was one of the original decision takers on the planning application and who clearly cannot therefore deliberate at ExCo on an appeal from their own decision.

Another planning paper sought approval for ExCo to remove permitted development rights for the recently approved planning application in respect of 25A Ross Road East.

Cllr Rendell explained: "Given that the house will occupy 35% of the plot and that there will be distances of 2 -2.5 metres from the south, east and west boundaries, Council agreed the recommendation of the Planning and Building Committee. The consequence of this is that planning permission will be required should the applicant wish to consider building any extensions or outbuildings within the curtilage of the existing approved application."

Also approved by ExCo was that Graham France should become the new lay member of the Planning and Building Committee, to replace Gerald Cheek, who recently completed his three year tenure.

FIG's 2006/07 surplus reaches more than £5 million

THE government's surplus for the last financial year is more than four and a half million pounds higher than forecast.

In a paper to Standing Finance Committee presented on Friday, November 30, Deputy Financial Secretary Keith Padgett gave an interim report on financial performance in 2006/07, pending the conclusion of the external audit.

The projected surplus was just over £5.6m instead of the original of £996,000, with a budget surplus of just over £2m after accounting for depreciation. This surplus was the result of additional revenue from investments, taxation and fishing licence fees.

In addition, departmental underspends amounted to 4%, the result of possible over budgeting in some areas.

At the meeting, Mr Padgett also gave a report on financial transactions that had occurred during the first four months of this financial year, instead of the customary three months.

In general, he said, revenue variances were higher than anticipated, due mainly to payments relating to 2006/07 being received at the start of the current financial year.

Income from fishing licences was £1,258,000 over budget due to a good illex season and the receipt of some income relating to 2006/ 07.

The illex fishery has not fully recovered however - it was noted that as of October 31, 50 licences had been sold when the government had expected to have sold ten more by that time.

Operating expenditure for the first four months of this financial year was a million pounds over budget due predominantly to a loss on the sale of investments affected by concerns within international financial markets and extra spend on medical treatment overseas. Invoices for such treatment are often received up to four months after the treatment takes place, Mr Padgett said, which means that some of the invoices being paid in the first four months of this year relate to 2006/ 7 treatments.

The Consolidated Fund currently stands at £94 million.

Mr Padgett told Penguin News he was not aware of any capital overspends being projected for this financial year: "At this stage they are all anticipated to be within approved budgets."

As for the operating budget, he said it was too early to tell yet what the outcome for this financial year was likely to be. He commented "We should know more in January when the revised budget submissions are made by departmental managers."

LegCo motion lapses

A MOTION which was to be proposed in Legislative Council by former councillor Richard Davies has been put aside until after the by-election.

The motion which included terms for opening up to the public the processes of decision making within and by the government lapsed because Dr Davies, the proposer, was no longer a member of LegCo.

Making a brief statement to the House on Friday, Councillor Janet Robertson asked that the motion be considered at a later date, once the New Year by-election had been held.

in the second pass-out. The FIDF's Officer Commanding, Major Peter Biggs, praised the recruits for the hard work and dedication they showed during their initial training course. He added: "I hope they will build on this by taking advantage of the ongoing training programme".

He also commented on the high standards and dedication of the training team, headed by WO2 Steve Tooby RM, and on the "excellent work" of the safety staff and exercise troops throughout the exercise.

Domestic violence: unreported crimes

THIS week is International Domestic Violence Week.

Although some cases of domestic violence are reported to the police, the true extent of the problem is not known, as many cases go unreported.

Police officer Priscilla Halliday said there are many reasons for under reporting: "The stigma of a failing relationship, concern about what may happen to children, worries about how to cope as a single parent or perhaps the hope that a partner will reform if he or she is given another chance. There may also be financial concerns and housing worries," she said.

Research in the UK has shown that domestic violence will typically occur 35 times before an abused partner reports the matter to the police for the first time.

PC Halliday commented: "It is important all victims have the confidence to come forward and report domestic violence as the Royal Falkland Islands Police (along with other departments) can offer advice, help and support when dealing with such cases.

"The most important step is to confide in someone you trust and to contact the police or other agency. If you wish to speak to a female/male police officer to discuss a domestic violence issue in confidence please call 28100 or email safe@police.gov.uk or alternatively contact the Social Work Team on 27296 or your doctor on 28000."

3% increase on hospital charges

HEALTH and Social Services charges have been increased by three per cent, in line with inflation.

The policy of increasing charges in line with inflation had been recommended to Executive Council by the former Director of Health and Social Services, and should avoid any radical increases in the future, unless there is evidence of a large increase in providing services in a specific area. Councillor Mike Rendell said.

He commented: "The schedule of charges covers a range of services provided by the KEMH including non-entitled patient charges, visits to ships, public health tests and inspections, vaccinations, medical examinations, dental charges and meal charges." Executive Council also approved the purchase of four animal crates to supplement the two already being supplied for use by the *Concordia Bay*.

Cllr Rendell said the crates will enable the efficient movement of sheep and cattle principally between farms and Sand Bay abattoir, and will be built in compliance with animal movement regulatory requirements.

He commented: "Whilst the cost of each crate will be nearly £30,000, it is estimated that the return on investment will be 3.6 years. This return will be to farmers and the abattoir rather than to FIG and will be in the form of increased values in sheep weights due to avoidance of weight loss."

Revised southern sailing handbook relaunched

A RECEPTION to mark the publication of the second edition of the book *Southern Ocean Cruising*, was held at the UNEP World Conservation Monitoring Centre in Cambridge earlier this month.

Hosted by the second edition authors Sally Poncet. Susie Grant and Colin Harris, the reception was an informal get together for colleagues and friends who included representatives from the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, British Antarctic Survey and WCMC.

Sally and Jérôme Poncet wrote this classic handbook in 1991 with the aim of highlighting the special nature of the Southern Ocean, Antarctica and the sub-Antarctic islands, and their inherent fragility. In the 15 years since there have been far-reaching changes to environmental regulations in the region, Sally said, including the adoption of the Protocol on Environmental Protection to the Antarctic Treaty in 1991.

"Updates on regulations were provided by authorities from the various government representatives from the subAntarctic and Antarctic communities. including FIG's Customs and Immigration. Mineral Resources and Environment Office." she said.

"The book aims to provide information on the new environmental regulations, with

particular emphasis on the yachting community."

This second edition was accomplished with the support of the Government of the British Antarctic Territory and Polar Regions Unit, Overseas Territories Directorate of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

Summers and Clausen head to Brussels

COUNCILLORS Andrea Clausen and Mike Summers are in Brussels this week for a meeting of the Overseas Countries and Territories of the European Union.

They will be discussing two key issues - the long term relationship between the OCTs and the allocation of funding under the 14th EDF.

Cllr Summers said the meeting will debate what the OCTs' long term relationship with the EU should be: "Should it be a closer relationship, which would mean more European-style legislation and probably more funding as we become a closer part of the family, or should we move further away? Or should we stay where we are?"

As for the next round of European funding, ClIr Summers said the Falklands have been allocated four million Euros. He commented: "There will be some discussions as a group about what the EU is expecting from us with regards to spending the EDF - it is likely we will look at similar areas as last time and indeed what we are expecting from them.

On December 4, Cllr Summers will join Cllr Janet Robertson in London for the annual meetings of the OT Consultative Council.

Ambassador gets to know the Falklands



THE British ambassador to Chile used a visit to the Islands last week as a fact finding mission.

Howard Drake said the Falklands was an important part of his job and he wanted to get to know the Islands personally: "The Chilean positron on the sovereignty issue is well known. From time to time we talk about specific issues here and (it is useful) for me to be able to come down here and get a bit of a better first-hand understanding of what people in the Islands feel."

Mr Drake said Chile was consistent in their support of the Argentine claim and added: "My job is to ensure they fully understand the UK position and indeed the view of the Falkland Islanders which is most important."

He said he had met a number of Islanders and heard "many shades of opinion." He also met Chilean members of the community who had made the Islands their home

Chilean consul?

Last month Falklands councillors said they intended to raise with Mr Drake the idea of having a Chilean consul or some sort of representative for Chileans living in the Falklands.

At a press conference held on Friday. Mr Drake indicated that the subject had not been raised, however councillors later said this was not true, but that there were "sensitivities" to consider. Councillor Janet Robertson said Mr Drake had advised that it was unlikely the Chilean government would - given that it is attempting to build good relations with Argentina - promote what is essentially a political recognition of the Falklands by having a Chilean consul in the Islands.

Cllr Robertson admitted it had been her idea because she felt Chileans living in the Falklands did not have anyone who could represent their interests. However she added that any Chileans working in the Falklands could, like anyone else, take their concerns to the General Employees Union.

After the ceremony at the Battle Memorial there will be a march past. His Excellency the Governor will take the Salute from a dais at the entrance gates to Government House lawns.



Tracking skuas to winter foraging grounds

AS penguins and prions are well settled onto their nests or in their burrows, predators and scavenging birds like Falklands skuas are beginning to visit the colonies seeking out abandoned eggs, the first hatched chicks and all the food that gets spilled over on a busy seabird colony.

Skuas time their own breeding with the penguins and prions, so that they can take advantage of the seasonal abundance provided by other birds.

But when the penguins and prions complete breeding and migrate, what happens to the skuas? Where does their next meal come from now? In a world first, scientists from New Island Conservation Trust and British Antarctic Survey have tracked Falklands and brown skuas during the winter months to discover the answers.

Dr Paulo Catry of New Island Conservation Trust attached a small geo-locating device on the legs of a few Falklands skuas on New Island during the summer of 2003/04. By the end of the 2004/ 05 summer, four of these birds had been re-captured and the stored location data had been successfully downloaded.

"We suspected that skuas lived an oceanic life during winter, as virtually all skuas do," said Paulo. "But, before this study, we had no idea where the Falkland ones spent the winter, so it was thrill-



ing to recapture the birds equipped with the locating devices and download and process the data."

When the tracks of the four skuas were mapped, it was apparent that the centre of the winter foraging grounds was not on the Patagonian shelf where albatrosses, white-chinned petrels and migratory penguins are mostly found, but rather on the outer edge of the continental shelf break where the water is between 3,000 to 4,000 m deep. Birds departed in March, and lived totally at sea, before returning to New Island in November.

Surprisingly the skuas chose to forage in not very productive waters. "At present we have no idea why they seem to favor such water masses. More research will be needed to elucidate this," explained Paulo.

Union men's loyalty recognised



HAVING together clocked up almost 148 years of being with the General Employees Union, three members had their loyalty recognised during a brief presentation this week.

Val Berntsen, Barry Neilson and Raymond Newman (pictured left - right above) were presented with whisky glasses engraved with the Union crest and brief message and also a cheque for $\pounds 50$ each.

Union Chairman Gavin Short said the gifts were a sign of appreciation of the men's unstinting support for, and work on behalf of the GEU.

Between them they have served in the posts of chairman, vice chairman, members of the executive committee and both Camp and Stanley delegates and have collectively notched up about 148 years of being Union members.

Ray Newman joined the Union in April 1957, Val Berntsen in October 1957 and Barry Neilson in August 1960.

He said studies like this one highlighted that the world's oceans were not empty places and for the Falkland Islands to protect its wildlife the landowners, the scientists and the community had to look beyond their own 200 nautical mile limit to the high seas. which are not under the management of any individual country or organisation.

• If you think the migrations made by Falklands skuas is something special, then a new study commencing in December might just reveal a Falklands migration far more amazing. Dr Bill Montevecchi and Dr April Hedd, of Memorial University of Newfoundland, will be arriving in the Falklands in early December to equip similar devices to sooty shearwaters.

Scientists recently discovered that sooty shearwaters breeding in New Zealand migrate northwards to the Russian Far East, cross over to California and then return home via Hawaii.

The Canadian scientists suspect that Falklands sooty shearwaters may be making an equally impressive route that takes in the waters of Newfoundland, Europe and Africa. We'll keep you posted about how that study progresses.

West Store development supported by HBC

A RECENT meeting of the Historic Buildings Committee learned that the Falkland Islands Company Ltd (FIC) are planning an extension to the West Store including a new entrance and car park improvements.

The Environmental Planning Officer (EPO) advised that the application was to demolish the existing Basics building to erect an extension providing retail, storage and office space.

FIC General Manager Roger Spink said the plans also incorporate a 36 bay carparking area and a level entrance to the West Store at the rear.

Government Archivist Jane Cameron said that the Basics building was unique because of the proportion of the roof to the walls and it would be ideal if this characteristic could be used in the new extension, however the committee did not want to obstruct plans to improve the main retail premises in the town.

Ms Cameron said that in many instances FIC had looked after their historic buildings well and it was encouraging to learn that they were prepared to discuss the listing of some of them in the future.

The committee agreed that the finishing materials should reflect the more traditional character of Stanley rather than the existing recent extension.

Ms Cameron will submit the committee's comments on the application to the EPO for submission to the Planning and Building Committee.

Legislative Council coverage: Is positive discrimination still valid?

Tributes paid to David Taylor

BEFORE the meeting Legislative Council began on Friday, November 23, councillors held a minute's silence in memory of the Falklands' first Chief Executive, David Taylor, who passed away earlier this month.

Councillor Mike Summers described Mr Taylor as am extraordinary man who came at an extraordinary time in the Falklands' his-tory: "Right after the war when there were an awful lot of things that needed to be done. A huge amount of reconstruction work needed to be co-ordinated and pushed foward, there was no time for slow decision making and David was the right sort of man to push those things forward.

"But he also had to be incredibly creative in his thinking and in the exercise of his duties - he had the responsibility of recommending how the revised report of Lord Shackleton from 1982 should be carried forward. He was responsible for the reform of the public service and for the creation of the Falkland Islands Development Corporation, he was responsible in many ways for the beginnings in the creation of the Falklands fishing zone and many other things. He made a tremendous contribution to Falklands life in his work.

Financial Secretary Derek Howatt worked with Mr Taylor. He told LegCo: "He was a very hard working man but also a funny man: I remember he used to occasionally call me the Master of the Rolls. That was simply because the Treasury was the closest department to the toilets.'

Local deaths

A number of councillors also used their speeches to the motion to express their condolences to the families of Islanders Tony Pettersson and Graham Middleton.

Tony, who was a public servant for over 40 years, passed away after a long illness, while Graham died suddenly at Goose Green where he was based with the Public Works Department.

'Extra resources' for **FICS** after inspection

SUPPORT is needed for the Education Department following the recent inspection report, Cllr Stevens has said.

He commented: "It is clear that although there is a lot of quality throughout the service, there are areas, particularly in the Community School where we need to improve."

He said the Education Board had looked at ways of supporting the Community School and it would be helped through additional resources that would address the issues highlighted in the report and hopefully within the existing budget.

These recommendations will go to the next ExCo in December, Cllr Stevens said.

SHOULD the government's employment policy of positive discrimination continue? Cllr Clausen wants to have a debate on the issue.

She said the policy may not always be sensible or logical and added: "It is not clear that the policy that exists for the public service is applied equally to the private sector or if indeed it is different. *

While acknowledging that there were justifiable reasons why the policy was first put in place she suggested it was time to look at the issue again.

She told LegCo: "We need to look at the long term aspects of such a policy on our economy and are we indeed at times promoting a level of mediocrity in our society in order to adhere to a policy that may well be out of date?

Later that day, Clir Robertson said the government spent a lot of money on educating Falkland Is-landers and wanted to encourage them to return to take up good jobs. However she added: "I can un-

derstand why sometimes there are difficulties - I wouldn't want us in any way to get into the situation where Falkland Islanders ever felt that they could be second best because they were Falkland Islanders.

"I think it's how you approach the positive discrimination issue and how you deal with it is absolutely critical. We do want our Falkland Islanders to be the best - world class - and we want to encourage that aspiration."

She added: "It's a serious subject and a difficult one. We need feedback from everybody."

Cllr Summers said he was in favour of positive discrimination. He commented: "I think it is right that you should make every effort to employ your own people as best you can before you bring immigrant labour in."

However he added: "Does this policy of employment in the government fit with the private sector or should there be some other arrangement with the private sector?

"Should you be obliging a company to employ a serial drunk when they could perfectly well employ somebody good from elsewhere?"

He said he felt Cllr Clausen may have been suggesting it was time to relax the positive discrimination policy however he asked if, instead, employers should be taking more risks with employing Islanders:

He commented: "Do we actually take enough risks with employing local people? We insist they have 'x' number of years' experience and qualifications when very often the job can probably be done by somebody with not necessarily the relevant qualifications.

"We've taken that risk before and some of them have paid off and some haven't."

Cllr Clausen is to bring a motion to the House in the New Year to allow a debate on the issue.

Pilgrimage therapeutic 'for all'

THE pilgrimage by more than 200 veterans was an "incredible community event" for the Falkland Islands.

That was the overwhelming message from councillors at Friday's meeting of LegCo.

Cllr Stevens said: " I wonder if any other community could have offered the beds, the vehicles and the depth of friendship and gratitude that were on display during the SAMA visit.'

Cllrs Cockwell and Clausen said the pilgrimage was of benefit to Falkland Islanders as well as the veterans and Cllr Rendell agreed. He commented: "It is absolutely clear that many of those people that came back had got tremendous benefit from the visit and so did a lot of Falkland Islanders who went through a lot of difficulty in 1982. I think a lot of ghosts were laid to rest.

There is still more to be done, he said: "There are a lot more that are sitting on street corners, sipping away on a bottle of whisky, who nobody knows about, who probably nobody really cares about. It is those people who, in my mind, need to be targeted if at all possible '

He added: "We shouldn't assume that because we've gone through the 25th anniversary that that is the end of it - there are many thousands of veterans who could probably benefit from a return visit to the Falklands and I hope that in the long term that can be achieved.

One constituency?

COUNCILLOR Clausen wants to hold a referendum on a single constituency for the Falklands.

However, she insists that by supporting a referendum she does not wish to see the Camp vote marginalised.

She told LegCo: "I would only support moving to a single constitu-ency if there was an appropriate voting system to back that up, if representation was as fair as it can possibly be.

Falklands councillors are elected to represent their country, not just their electorate, she said: "It is very important that you represent your constituents but you are responsible for Falklands Plc.

'I believe that having a single constituency could be a way to progress and reinforce that.

Cllr Hansen said he could see no benefits a single constituency would bring to the Camp in particular and to the Falklands as a whole. How-ever, he added: "If this is an issue the present council feels it should discuss I would be very interested to hear the views of not only my colleagues but both the Stanley and Camp electorates."

Before he was elected Cllr Rendell felt a single constituency would be best for the Islands. However, his opinion has now changed: "I think that there would be a danger, depending on who was elected, in the Camp losing any kind of influence at all in what happens in the Camp."

He added: "I don't for one minute suggest that that is the case with the existing council - in fact, you couldn't have asked for a more sympathetic bunch, but that might not always be the case.'

'Zero tolerance' on drugs in Islands

COUNCILLORS are concerned by the news that there are drugs in the community.

Cllr Summers said all Falklands councils have had a zero tolerance policy on drugs and this stance should be maintained.

He commented: They are, as I think many people will agree, the root of many evils, if not all of them.

He appealed to the public to share any information about the use or supply of drugs to the police: "It is critically important to us as a community that we do not allow drugs to play any part of life in these Islands.

Cllr Richard Cockwell said he would support the employment of a sniffer dog if it was needed. He commented: "It is a very serious matter, that drugs are becoming available in the Falklands. If it is deemed necessary that we buy ourselves a drugs dog, I will certainly support it. But let's hope it is not necessary.

Cllr Janet Robertson said it was not just the practical presence or availability of drugs that needed to be addressed but also the public attitude to them: "And not just drugs but also alcohol and underage sex. they are all areas we need to be concerned about.'

For that reason she was pleased that the Chief of Police had announced the DARE programme is to be extended from the Infant and Junior School through to the Community School.

Hansen: 'look at positives in Camp'

CRITICS of investment in Camp have been attacked by Councillor Ian Hansen.

In his speech to the motion for adjournment Cllr Hansen said it was easy to focus on pessimism and criticism directed at Camp but he urged people to consider the established and successful business enterprises operating in and from the Camp -"such as Southern Imports, Saddle Computers, Warrah Design [and] the new tannery at Hill Cove.

He commented: "All these have the belief and the business acumen to believe they can be successful outside Stanley. When you take into account the lodges and selfcatering units that are operating, it all adds up to a pretty positive picture.'

However, just having a positive attitude is not enough, Cllr Hansen said, and risks need to be taken on new ventures. He commented: "I do believe that those who first thought of the concept of roads, the abattoir, wind farming, television in Camp - if those people had taken heed of the minority of people who in each case were adamant

that these things couldn't happen. there is no question in my mind that they wouldn't have happened.

"I do firmly believe that not only this present council but future councils should take the attitude that, while new ventures may not be immediately smooth running and perfect, we should at least have the confidence to put them in place and try them and look at them with common sense, both financially and practically."

A change of name?

SHOULD Legislative Council be called something else?

Cllr Cockwell says the term 'councillor' creates confusion at overseas conferences and meetings: "It's from when we were a colony, we were a council just like a rural council or town council in the UK. We are not now, we are a legislative assembly.

"I would like to change the name from Legislative Council to Legislative Assembly."

'Poor comms can increase isolation'

of THE breakdown communications in Camp means people in the rural community feel more isolated than ever, according to Cllr Mike Rendell.

He told Legislative Council that the medium wave transmitter at Bush Rincon had caught fire several days before meaning there were no BFBS 2 transmissions; in addition, a number of people were hav-ing problems in Camp with their internet connections and the television was off in many parts of Camp too.

He commented: "These are all issues which are under consideration but we need to move on apace and get those people out there, who world. "I think we all sit here in town and tend to forget the situation that the Camp is in. We need to move

on as quickly as we can." Cllr Robertson agreed. She said: "We must work and find a solution to this because while we are building roads and spending vast amounts of money on ferries, in some ways people are even more isolated than before a single road was built. Communications are absolutely essential if we want to see the Camp develop."

lack of understanding between all these groups.'

She said the Islands should try to find more occasions where people of all ages are allowed to enjoy themselves together.

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DEALS NOT TO BE MISSED!

By Tony Chater, New Island THE images of *Explorer* lying on her side in the ice last week touched thousands of hearts across the world as well as many here in the Islands.

For this was no ordinary ship. Elegant, trim and charismatic, she blazed most of the trails for the modern expedition cruise ship industry. She put Antarctica, and to a lesser extent, the Falklands, on the map. Over a period of nearly 40 years she became among the best-known and was arguably the best-loved ship in the world.

My wife, Kim, made over 80 voyages onboard as an artist and naturalist. She visited places as far apart as the Pacific Islands, the upper Amazon, the Arctic Circle in the north and the Antarctic Circle in the south.

I too had the pleasure of working onboard, also as a naturalist, for over 30 voyages between 1994 and 2000. Like many other couples, we met onboard (at table five). She was that kind of ship.

As a young girl *Explorer* was adventurous and sexy, in middle age she was a glamour puss and, as an old lady, she maintained both her charm and her dignity. Passengers enjoyed the intimacy of the famous bar with its tiny, round dance-floor; the cramped cabins and narrow stairwells; the saucy sauna and a lecture hall so cosy and sleep-inducing that it was known by us all as "the womb".

Below deck, tucked away from the limelight and crammed into the ship's bowels were the seahardened crewmen and women, the lifeblood of every vessel, for whom she was a second home. The Little Red Ship, you might say, was small but perfectly formed.

Explorer's sad but spectacular demise last week was the perfect end to the glittering career of one of the great little ships of our time. It is fitting that she rests now on the seabed under the ice and close to the great white continent she knew so well.

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There will be many a glass raised in her memory. Ours will be amongst them.

We will, most certainly, not see her like again.

Lindblad Explorer: 'ahead of the competition and ahead of her time'

MANY people will be saddened to hear of the loss of the *GAP Explorer*.

This ship was built for her first owner, Lars-Eric Lindblad as the famous *Lindblad Explorer* in Finland in 1969.

She was designed especially for polar expedition cruises and was the first one of her kind in the Antarctic.

She was 250 ft long with a draft of 14 ft and carried about 100 passengers and stag, and in her time sailed the furthest north and south of any cruise ship.

She retained the name Lindblad Explorer for 15 years before being sold to another company who renamed her Explorer, and then GAP Explorer by her last owners.

The Little Red Ship made her maiden voyage to the Falklands in January 1970, and her first stop was West Point on the 26th. That visit lasted two days while the ship waited for the weather to improve before visiting Carcass.

Her last visit was only two weeks ago on November 13, 2007.

In the early days, she was often under the command of Captain Kent Graukvist but her best known captain was Hasse Nilsen.

It was under his command that the ship made the first ever cruise ship voyage through the North West Passage.

Other tour operators copied her itineraries and her style but the Little Red Ship was always ahead of them and of her time.

Years after she had ceased to be owned by Lars-Eric, the *Lindblad Explorer* still came up often in our conversations, and Lars-Eric said: "You know, when she becomes old and no longer able to make these voyages of adventure, I would like her to end her days in Antarctica rather than

Mount Pleasant Riding Club saddle up and hit the track to Darwin

By Sharon Jaffray "A WEEKEND jaunt to Darwin," was how I viewed the two day horse ride from Wine Glass Station, as I set out on Friday morning. To all involved it became much more than that.

Seven riders from Mount Pleasant. Tim and Hayley Bonner and myself all met at the Mount Pleasant Riding Club soon after 11am. Our mission was to ride to Darwin along some of the old riding track with presentations along the way about 2 Para's successful battle to retake Goose Green from the occupying Argentine forces in 1982

But first we had to get geared up and away - no mean feat for Bobby Short, owner and instructor of the Club who has to decide what horse best suits the rider's individual ability, check all the gear and keep an eye on every-

thing. With everyone keen to get underway it was soon time to mount. Bobby took each rider and was giving them strict instructions on how to mount when all hell broke loose behind us. Sally Payton had accepted the offer of a leg-up from fellow Flight Lieutenant Dave Black and the horse had taken exception, throwing her to the ground

Bobby's subsequent outburst left us all in no doubt that this was not acceptable and earned him the rank of Sergeant Major as he berated the pair for not having waited for his instruction.

Not at all deterred, Sally, an experienced rider with some 12 years of competitive endurance riding under her belt, immediately earned our respect as she climbed back on the horse and picked up the lead of a spare horse for the trip. With what was to become a famil-

iar call from Bobby - "Are you all good? Then lets go!" we hit the track.

Many years ago this was the only way to travel between settlements and Stanley, whether for social reasons, to work or to seek medical attention children too small to ride were carried on the front of the gear.

With a very light wind, the sun occasionally breaking through and the horses settling into a steady pace it was easy to imagine that it would have been an idyllic era to have lived in.



things when all is going well, but anyone who has spent time with horses will know that it doesn't always go to plan.

Setting a good pace along the ridge as we approached Mustard River, Flt Lt Paddy Durnin's horse stuck its foot in a hole causing him to hit the deck in a classic over-the-shoulder-roll, horribly familiar to most riders. Paddy, much to everyone's amusement executed the move with his hands in the air as if saying, "It wasn't me, honest!

We were soon underway again and joking about "two down and nine to go" as we rode to the pass. "Perhaps someone could fall off in the stream to give me an action shot," I suggested as I got my camera out. With that there was a huge splash as Bobby's leading horse set back, pulling his riding horse down into the stream and losing its footing.

Scrambling madly to get upright, Charisma valiantly got to her feet with Bobby still in the saddle but thoroughly soaked from head to toe. After ascertaining he wasn't hurt we gave him a round of applause - and a motley selection of dry clothes. It wasn't the best situation for someone with "man-

flu" to be in but a quick slug from the rum bottle and it was "Are you all good? Let's go!"

There was less joking about who was going to be next and I promised not to make any more smart-ass suggestions for action shots!

Laguna Isla High Gate was the stop for lunch and here BFBS Presenter and history graduate Jenny Packham gave a talk about why it was necessary for 2 Para to retake Goose Green. It was here that we lost our first rider as Captain Jules MacRory who had been struggling with a sore back decided to ungear and continue to Darwin with Wayne Jones in the Land Rover.

Next stop was the Argentine cemetery where Jules shared information she had gathered about the construction of the cemetery.

Onwards we then headed, with Darwin in sight, to the Colonel H Jones Memorial where Corporal Wendy Ransom gave a presentation about the man who is considered to have made the retaking of Goose Green possible, when he lead the successful storming of an Argentine position. The group agreed that it was a particularly poignant moment when they sat on the hillside, as the sun began to lose its warmth and

discussed the sort of leader he was and the possible reasons for his actions. Darwin House was a welcome sight for all after the best part of seven hours

in the saddle and the idea of a jacuzzi was very much to the fore of the girl's minds as they dismounted. The easy part was over - the mom-

ing would bring stiffness to long forgotten muscles, gale force winds and another six hour ride. Saturday

Sally's unfortunate incident the previous morning had manifested itself in some severe bruising to the hip and slight swelling to her lower leg and she sensibly decided she wouldn't ride the return trip.

Jules' back was feeling better and she was determined to finish the second leg. Bobby rallied around and changed horses to give her a more comfortable mount and increase her chances of completing the task.

After gearing up in the shelter of the Galpon at Darwin it was out into the wind with the horses keen to go home.

An hour and a half into the ride Jenny's horse Minnihoma tripped and/ or slipped, landing heavily on his hip leaving him lame and unridable and

Jenny on the deck. She was quick to point out that it was, in fact, the first time in three years she had fallen off and it wasn't exactly her fault.

I offered my mount Spitfire to Jenny to finish the ride and, feeling honourable, joined Bobby's wife Lyndsey in the Discovery - several hours later when the wind hadn't eased and had turned cold I decided I had in fact made a sensible move.

With Mally McLeod having joined the group shortly before there were still 11 riders and they set off again at a lively pace towards Laguna Isla where we were to meet up for a picnic lunch.

This was over half way and by now, although tired and sore, a pioneering spirit was setting in along with a need, not just a wish to finish the ride.

Jules was uncomfortable but sure she could complete it, while even seasoned rider Dave Black admitted that he was feeling the pinch.

With more than 23 years in the saddle behind him, Dave has ridden in the Falklands before, taking third in the Military race in both Stanley and North Arm in 1990. He also played polo against the shearers at North Arm which must have made an impression because he took it up as a sport with the RAF five years ago and plays several times a week when in the UK.

Riding regularly with Bobby, Dave has a developed a soft spot for Apache, a skewbald youngster he hopes to be able to enter in the Maiden Plate at the Christmas races who, over the two day ride, showed great potential and stamina, not to mention a lot of char-

"It's now a personal challenge for us in lots of different ways," Dave said. We've all gained different things from the experience and it has been great to have the support of the Islanders along the way.'

Jenny Packham said that since her arrival in the Islands she had been struck by the stunning scenery and the last two days had been no exception: "It makes me want to ring my mates in the UK who are probably sitting in a dark pub and tell them all about it - I sometimes do, but they don't understand - you have to be here to really

appreciate it." Wendy Ranson very nearly didn't ride on the second day after a spat of nerves when she was given Dixie to ride after bonding with Spitfire on the first day. Sergeant Major Short bellowed that she was more than capable of riding the new horse and he wouldn't put her on anything that wasn't safe. After a tense start to the ride she recognised that she had overcome a very common fear with riders - not many put their foot in the stirrup of a new horse without some apprehension and

many miss out when they give in to it. Military police officer Corporal Jackie Mayne, one of the tidiest riders I have ever seen, rode the entire two days without a murmur. "She keeps ringing up and asking if she can come for a lesson," laughed Bobby. "I don't think there is much any of us could teach her

At the end of the two days there were lessons learned all around. While I don't think the names we use for our Falklands gear (tack) will ever slide off the tongues of the military riders coconilla (sheepskin), cabresto (leading rein) cabasada (bridle) and bastos (saddle) to name but a few - they had appreciated the Islands' ruggedness and beauty first hand in a truly Falklands fashion. We, meanwhile had taken a fresh look with them at our surroundings and aspects of our lifestyle we tend to take for granted.

There were many moments as we shared stories of the Islands and the changes we have gone through over the last 30 years that made me glad to have lived and worked here through the transition from horses to motorbikes and the introduction of roads, but none so great as when young Thomas Short appeared on the horizon to meet the riders.

Flying along on his cracking alasan (chestnut, to the uninitiated) mare with his father, Andrez, trying to keep up he encapsulated Falklands' freedom and our way of life in a brief, reassuring moment.

Safe in the hands of the next generation, the wide open spaces will be enjoyed and appreciated for a long time vet!



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Legislative Council: questions for oral answer

Road grading - what are the priorities?

PRIORITY for the grading of roads is given to those that carry the highest traffic levels, Councillor Mike Rendell has told a meeting of Legislative Council (LegCo).

Responding to a question from Cllr Richard Stevens, Cllr Rendell said account is also taken of conditions on "lighter trafficked" sections, adding that every effort is made to balance the needs of all users

Reading a response provided by the Director of Public Works, Clir Rendell said the Highways Section carried out road inspections both formally and informally "virtually

continuously". He told LegCo: "Grading programmes based on these inspections are then produced and work is carried out accordingly

"Grading is carried out whenever the road conditions are suitable, which is mainly the spring and summer months but there are occasional breaks even in the winter when we can do some work of this nature.

'It would be preferable to do all of the grading in the spring time, when the material is more workable due to higher moisture content, but will ordinarily then relatively quickly dry and retain shape for longer, but this is not logistically possible as there are now over 900 kilometres of road in the Islands.

He outlined places where the grading work is in progress and added that some capping work, which both improves the running surface and the case with which grading can be effected, has already been done this season, notably on the San Carlos and North Arm sections of road

He added: "At the end of summer we would hope that all sections of road that need it would have been graded but that also capping will have been carried out to sections leading out from Port Howard, the New Haven Road and North Camp

Cllr Stevens asked his colleague how prioritising for work was decided and whether landowners were consulted on what areas needed gradıng

Cllr Rendell said he believed the PWD Roads Engineer would receive feedback from people who had particular worries about road conditions in their area.

He commented: "If there isn't consultation going on, I would suggest it would be in the best interests of the road user who felt there might be a problem with a specific area to address their issues with the Roads Engineer or the Director of Public Works."

Cllr Janet Robertson said it seemed that less grading work was being carried out on West Falkland than on the East and asked if in future this would become more even

Cllr Rendell said this was an issue relating to plant and equipment: 'As more work is completed on East Falklands so it will ease up equipment and resources to do work on the West," he said.

A POINTS system is in place for the allocation of houses to people on the housing list, councillors heard at last week's meeting of LegCo.

Cllr Mike Summers said the current system was adopted in July 2006 and has been in use since then, with minor adjustments to the application form,

The system, he said, was primarily based on the size and makeup of the family unit, the size of existing housing relative to that, as well as medical and social needs, age of applicants and financial situation including savings and earnings, being under notice to guit and any previous record as an FIG tenant or debtor.

How much power will VSAT systems need?

Housing points system to be published

THE power requirements for the new VSAT telecommunications systems in Camp could vary greatly, according to Cllr Richard Stevens.

He said Cable and Wireless had advised that factors such as the equipment manufacturer, size of antenna, location of the terminal, bandwidth required and the satellite being used could mean power consumption could range from a hundred watts to a kilowatt or more.

However, he added that people with VSAT systems already in use in the Islands had advised that they required a low level of power: "It would be in the hundreds of watts rather than the kilowatt."

Cllr Stevens said system design and integration work for the new

Additionally, residents returning from training as professionals gained points, as did those that were overcrowded or in a house share.

He added: "Consideration is also given to those wishing to transfer to another FIG property where this better optimises usage.

The details of the system had not been published, although there was no reason why they should not be, Cllr Summers said.

He added: "The information sought on the standard application form makes clear in terms of the information sought, what criteria are likely to be taken into account '

Camp network was on-going and a VSAT equipment vendor had not yet been selected so Cable and Wireless were unable to provide an ex-

act figure for power consumption. He commented: "The aim of the on-going design work is to try to include as many of the remoter areas as possible in the terrestrial radio network to reduce the number of locations which will be connected using VSAT solutions.

Whilst Cable and Wireless will manage the design, procurement and installation of the power systems required by the Camp network, the government has agreed to fund the cost of the initial installation of these systems.

Spotlight on councillors - Part 3:

CONCLUDING our coverage to mark the second anniversary of the election of Legislative Council on November 17, *Penguin News* questions councillors on their manifesto pledges and portfolios.

MIKE RENDELL (CAMP)



PN: In your manifesto you said you would strive to expand tourism opportunities in camp. How have you delivered on this?

MR: By ensuring that the Camp roads programme progresses in a timely fashion so as to ensure that easy access is possible to all farms.

This has included the completion of the link road from San Carlos to Greenfield, and this season by the installation of a bridge over the San Carlos River, thus allowing tourists quick and easy access to all of the North Camp.

Improved road access and the ferry provide tremendous tourism opportunities for the Camp, but it is for Campers themselves to take advantage of these opportunities using agencies such as FIDC and FITB.

PN: Do you feel the Newhaven and Second Creek terminal designs are over-specced? How will you ensure spending does not spiral out of control?

MR: The specification for the West Falkland terminal is probably still some way from being finalised, but for Newhaven several different options were considered before the final design was agreed.

I do not believe that the Newhaven terminal design is overspecced. It is a fact that Newhaven is the home port of the *Concordia Bay* and that it therefore needs to be a safe haven in all weather conditions.

To skimp on the design would be a false economy if the end result was that the ship ended up on the beach after a big storm.

The cost of construction materials, particularly from overseas, are outside the control of FIG. For example, sheet piling (a major cost component of the terminals) has rapidly increased in price during the last few months, a factor which is totally outside our control. So whilst significant efforts are made to keep costs under control it is just not possible to guarantee the amount of the final spend.

PN: Some people are concerned about the level of expenditure being pumped into rural projects (abattoir, ferry link etc). How would you respond to this criticism?

MR: If you don't ensure that the Camp community has the 'tools to do the job' then how is the Camp ever going to get to a situation where it is able to compete on a level playing field?

The most important tools include roads, a regular ferry service and the abattoir, but quality of life issues also need to be properly addressed, including improved telecommunications and upgraded radio and TV networks. Once everything is in place expenditure will drop significantly and over time Camp incomes will rise.

I have always believed that you need to speculate to accumulate, and will continue to support these levels of expenditure, but only until such time as the tools are in place.

PN: The measures to assist farmers introduced last year included a one year holiday from interest on mortgages. What did these measures actually achieve in practical terms for farmers?

MR: It should have given farmers more cash, to buy a fourwheeler for example, or to buy materials for much needed basic farm maintenance. Many farmers took advantage of the offer, but it was always intended as a one-off 'quick fix'.

PN: What are your priorities for the next two years?

MR: I would really like to play a part in continuing the momentum on getting the new ferry and coastal shipping service fully up to speed, and to continue with support for my other existing portfolios.

Portfolio changes are going to be made so it is difficult to forecast what responsibilities I will have then. Whatever they are, I am keen to see more business opportunities being created, both in Stanley and the Camp.

I expect that like the first two years, many unexpected things will crop up.

As an example, when I got the Health and Medical Services portfolio colleagues and officers supported the need for major work in upgrading dental facilities, an area which was certainly not on my priority list when elected.

JANET ROBERTSON (STANLEY)



PN: You are attributed with banning the sale of sweets in the Leisure Centre but you are opposed to a ban on smoking. Isn't this approach hypocritical?

JR: I understand that the issue of sweet sales in the Leisure Centre was in place before I came onto Council, although I do support it.

With regard to smoking, I am not at all against organisations or individuals banning smoking on their property: I support Government's decision to ban smoking in all its' public buildings. What I object to is using legislation to achieve an objective before other methods have been trialled.

I add that I would most seriously be against any proposal to make a law banning the eating of sweets in public!

PN: What's the hold up with the Road Traffic Bill?

JR: The second draft of the RT Bill was due to be submitted to ExCo in July. However, due to staffing shortages and other priorities at the Attorney General's Chambers at the time, it was agreed that the second draft could be submitted to ExCo once the Chambers were fully staffed and new staff settled in. The second draft is being submitted to November ExCo.

PN: Do you feel the government's spending is out of control?

JR: Managing expectations, achieving a balanced budget and identifying areas of development, have been key issues for all councils, and will undoubtedly continue to be so. In order to achieve this a number of policies have been put in place, such as the User-Pays scheme and the decision to allocate Holiday Credits on actual budget surpluses rather than as a projected expenditure.

Meanwhile, commitment to the abattoir, to the ferry, to the dockyard development, even to the Exercise Referral Practitioner, are all examples of investment in schemes which will bring long-term benefit to the Islands, potential for development, and ultimately savings on government expenditure.

The critical issue at every budget session is to balance the provision of services against the need to fund development – there is no magical formula, but I believe that councillors seek to achieve the best outcome for the Islands as a whole.

PN: What are your priorities for the next two years?

To complete the Immigration policy, to contribute to a final decision on port development, and to assist the councillor for Education in ensuring that our schools provide the best possible service to our children.

These are central themes for me, but my list of desirable goals is much more extensive than that!

RICHARD STEVENS (CAMP)



PN: In your manifesto you said you had strong views on accountability - "capital project costs that escalate, someone should be held responsible." The costs of the abattoir have escalated, the ferry terminals costing has been deemed by many as excessive but no one is being held responsible. Have you let your supporters down?

RS: I do feel strongly about accountability and escalating costs and work hard with my colleagues to control all expenditure. A recent example of this that I have been directly involved in is the cost of roads to the proposed Cable and Wireless sites in Camp and the possibility of accomplishing the objectives in other cheaper ways.

Another example is employing Dr Chris Doyle, who has brought much needed expertise in understanding the business of Cable and Wireless so that we can justify their exclusivity and the level of FIG funding in upgrading and modernising camp telecommunications.

The management team of the abattoir have done many things to reduce the running costs but not only are we a slaughter house but a meat processing unit as well. This was not foreseen in the initial abattoir design and so changes

are needed. Many of the changes have to be made because of the EU Compliance issues. The viability has not been helped in the last few years by the loss of revenue for skins and the low market price of lamb and mutton.

The abattoir has to be seen as part of the bigger agricultural picture. The government made a conscious decision some years ago that they would stop direct subsidies to farms, but give them a second income stream in meat through the abattoir and money to invest in farm development to improve production in both wool and meat. It could be argued that if the abattoir closed a number of farms would fail which would lead to government supporting families in other ways, like social services and housing.

The ferry terminal at New Haven is meant to be the cheapest option if you take into account what is acceptable in safety and durability. Over time I hope everyone will see that the money spent is an investment and helps develop existing businesses and bring other opportunities to the East and West.

PN: The restructuring proposal for education attracted plenty of criticism and concern from teachers and the wider public when it was introduced. Is it simply change for change's sake and a waste of money?

RS: The restructuring of Education is very important and the most recent inspection highlights the need for change. The report identifies areas of great strength but also where there is work to be done. Here are a few examples of where the inspection report agrees with the restructuring proposals; "The Infant and Junior School is enriched by the joint work developing with the Falkland Islands Community School. Not enough notice is taken of students prior achievements before they enter FICS. More classroom monitoring and more rigorous tracking of pupils progress. Current leadership and management structure inadequate to drive improvements'

There has been a change in how inspections are carried out with schools and staff judging themselves as part of the process, with pupil and parent input as well. Most people felt that they/we can do better.

We have to have a system in place so that everyone can do the best job possible. That includes staff, heads and politicians who are held accountable by parents and the general public for the performance of all areas of education.

PN: The measures to assist farmers introduced last year included a one year holiday

from interest on mortgages. What did these measures actually achieve in practical terms for farmers?

RS: Most of the measures we support are designed to help farms with the long term viability of Camp in mind. The one year holiday from interest on mortgages gave some farms a financial lift which they could use in a number of ways, among them investing that money saved back into farm development. During this council the rules of the labour scheme have been relaxed and farmers can access these funds on their farms for a greater variety of work. The idea is that these schemes will help in a number of different areas from fencing to replacing the shearing shed roof.

PN: What are your priorities for the next two years?

RS: My priorities are to keep supporting the many Camp issues like the upgrading of the Cable and Wireless service to Camp which includes broadband, and if there is public support for the SSVC proposals see the introduction of an enhanced television service to Camp and Stanley.

If I retain the education portfolio, I will strive with all others to bring in the changes to the education department as suggested in the restructuring and confirmed by the recent inspection, that will give every student the best chance to achieve their full potential.

MIKE SUMMERS (STANLEY)



PN: During the election campaign you said you would baulk at the idea of using the internet as a way of informing people because it was elitist do you still stand by this?

MS: I think what I said was that simply assuming that information was in the public domain because it had been posted on a website was unsound - I maintain that view. Not everybody has regular access to a computer and the internet, and when they do they do not necessarily check government websites. The use of the internet is fine as part of a process, but it is not a panacea. PN: Many people worry the government's spending is out of control and not being allocated on projects that will show a return - how would you respond?

MS: I do not agree that government spending is out of control, though operating expenditure has reached its upper limits given current and projected income levels. Many of government's capital projects do not show a financial return, but are essential expenditure in maintaining or creating new infrastructure, which then allows the private sector to expand and flourish.

The government's balance sheet position is strong, and I continue to encourage more work on national statistics and the macroeconomic position to more accurately assess national growth. The new energy projects will of course show substantial returns on investment, but such projects are few and far between

PN: Affordable telecommunications are a priority for most people, both in town and in Camp. Are you happy that a close enough eye is being kept on pricing and services from C&W?

MS: The license agreement with C&W is ancient, and was written in a time before mobile, broadband and many other new developments. It does not give FIG as the regulator the necessary powers in all the respects we might wish. However in the recent discussions with C&W FIG has secured full financial disclosure for the first time, and has greater confidence in our ability to agree tariffs that are fair to both sides.

FIG continues to insist that all telecomms products regulated under the license must have the tariffs agreed by FIG before implementation, and we continue to discuss with C&W the processes for updating the license terms.

PN: Over the past two years a number of departments have been without a head or other key staff members for prolonged periods of time, because of recruitment complications – we have been assured for quite some time that councillors are looking at ways to speed things up but the problems continue.

Do you feel work is suffering as a result of these delays and what do you believe should be done to improve the situation?

MS: A number of parts of government, like much of the private sector, is working to maximum capacity and at maximum affordable budgets. This creates a number of stresses, but we all cope and get on with it. External recruitment is not that easy in a number of areas, and the Chief Executive is carrying out for councillors a review of terms and conditions compared to our principal recruitment markets (UK, Australia, NZ). If we end up having to pay more something will have to give.

Despite all this we have by and large an experienced and motivated public service who deliver good quality results. We should be proud of our achievements, as others from outside admire what we have done over the years. It has been particularly satisfying in this 25th Anniversary year to show our guests and veterans the progress we have made and continue to make in all areas of society.

PN: What are your priorities for the next two years?

MS: In no particular order: 1. Complete the review of the Constitution.

2. Complete and launch the new Islands Plan, and integrate it with medium term financial objectives.

3. Complete the modernisation of the transport and telecomms infrastructure.

4. Complete the planning for a new port and commence implementation.

5. Improve external airlinks.

6. Continue to promote internal self government and self determination as the key underlying bedrock of our democracy.

Albatross ambassadors on the sea

Continuing our ACAP series, this week we look at the role of the Falklands fishing industry in conservation

ON LAND, the Falklands ACAP seabirds - black-browed albatrosses, southern giant petrels and white-chinned petrels - are protected by 28 different landowners and managers that care for the sites where these species breed.

While they are out seeking for food in Falkland Islands waters, another group is at work to protect the seabirds from harm.

These ambassadors include the fishermen, directors and staff of fishing companies, fisheries observers and scientists employed by the Fisheries Department and Falklands Conservation, and fisheries officers who work from shore and at sea on the patrol vessels.

According to John Barton. Director of Fisheries. reducing the number of albatrosses and petrels accidentally killed by fishing boats has come about due to good cooperation and a willingness of everyone to make things work.

Fisheries Scientist Dr Paul Brickle has been involved in seabird bycatch issues in Falklands fisheries since 1995, including in 1996 designing for the CFL longliners the 'Brickle Curtain', a system of lines to keep seabirds away from the hook line as it is hauled back onto the longline, and which is now employed across the world. Paul commented: "The Falkland Islands fisheries now have minimal seabird bycatch and countries around the world seek advice from us about how we have achieved such a terrific level of success."

Paul, together with Ben Sullivan and Tim Reid of Falklands Conservation, also came up with the idea of using the longliner bird scaring lines on finfish and squid trawlers to reduce seabird deaths. Paul explained: "The albatrosses are attracted to the trawlers when they are discarding waste and bycatch, and if they are also towing a net, the birds can get caught on the towing lines and drown as they slice through the water. During 2003/04, we trialled three emerging mitigation devices including two streamers lines from the stern. The latter came out on top in terms reducing mortality the most."

Áccording to Tom Blake of the fishing company RBC, part of the success of the new technique was how Falklands Conservation went about getting the final design right: "FC observers spent a lot of time on the vessels trying different designs, and taking the ideas and comcerns of the officers and crew into account."

The Falkland Islands is one of few nations in the world where each fishery has an adopted National Plan of Action and mitiga-

tion measures brought into fishing licence conditions. Fisheries officers monitor how vessels implement these regulations during port calls, at-sea inspections and aerial surveillance.

Steve Waugh, a government Fisheries Officer since 1998, explained: "These days checking for the use of, measuring and advising about bird-scaring lines, line weighting and net types is an integral part of our inspection procedures."

Fisheries observers are also a critical part of the system of monitoring and educating crewmembers. Joost Pompert coordinates the Fisheries Department's team of eight observers who spend up to ten weeks at sea collecting information about the catch, both target and bycatch species. He commented: "Fish-ing companies, FIG and FC have the protection of the wildlife high on their agendas but often the crews aboard are more concerned with earning a decent living. Thus the observers play an important part in helping the crew to understand why seabird friendly practices are so important for the Falkland Islands."

Falkland Islands fishing companies also welcome the input of observers. Alex Reid of Polar said that there were always concerns and fears about implementing new measures and he believed that FC and FIFD observers worked well with the fleet to ensure that implementations go smoothly. He commented: "We are proud to have been able to accommodate and assist the observers and scientists that have joined our vessels."

The bird mortality in the finfish and squid trawler fleets is now thought to be virtually nil, down from an estimated 1,500 black-browed albatrosses in 2002/ 03 when few mitigating measures were used.

Consolidated Fisheries Ltd (Ltd) operate the two vessels in the toothfish longline fishery which met the Falklands National Plan of Action seabird bycatch target one year ahead of time. For the 7.6 million hooks set during 2006/07, each one baited with a juicy piece of squid, the estimated seabird bycatch rate was 0.0034 seabirds per 1,000 hooks.

CFL General Manager Daniel Matthews explained that this took focus, hard work and understanding: "The result is a testimony to the diligence of our crew and the observers."

Whilst our fisheries-based albatross ambassadors can be proud of their achievements to protect seabirds in Falkland Islands waters, black-browed albatrosses spend 50% of their time foraging outside of Falkland Islands waters. Joost commented: "Great dangers from fishing boats that use few or no seabird friendly practices await albatrosses on the high seas as well as in Brazilian waters and it may yet be worse for South Georgia's black-browed albatrosses, as they migrate as far as the waters of South Africa and Namibia.'

The government's environmental officer, Helen Otley said the success in the Falkland Islands in reducing seabird deaths is probably partly due to our small community, which allows direct and transparent communication. She commented: "As larger fishing nations look to our successes, there are certainly many Falklands techniques and methods of implementation and monitoring that can be copied and adapted.

"Perhaps it is now the role of Falkland Islands fishing companies to work with their partners and contacts in countries like Uruguay, Brazil, South Africa and Namibia and in the various fishing fleets that work across the high seas of the South Atlantic so that they can be ambassadors for the albatross as well."

Q WHAT marine facilities have been constructed by FIG in the last five years?

A Councillor Andrea Clausen answered this series of questions

Over the past five years FIPASS improvements and sea wall repairs have taken place, both of which are remedial rather than construction projects. The main construction project has been the replacement or improvement to jetties and ramps in Camp.

Q What marine facilities are currently underway?

A Marine facilities currently being constructed include the New Haven ferry terminal and improvements to the gulch at Sea Lion Island will start soon.

Q What are individual costs, historical or estimated, for each of these facilities?

A Total costs have been £94,860 FIPASS improvements, for £141,993 for sea wall repairs and (£907,417 in the past five years and £635,447 in the five years prior to that), the majority of which was funded by STABEX money from the European Union. The budgeted figure for the New Haven terminal is £1.1m.

O Councillors have stated that no work will take place on the Public Jetty in the absence of a submission showing the benefits. Have cost benefit studies been made for the marine facilities constructed previously and those now underway and

will FIG make the studies available to the public?

A Cost benefit studies as such were not carried out for any of the above mentioned projects except that without a functioning port facility there would be no ability to import/ export any cargo, receive small cruise vessels, deliver/receive any services including fuel and water for the country or for the fishing and hydrocarbon industries.

Regarding jetties and ramps in Camp, the Falkland Island Govern-ment had to justify the use of STABEX funds to the European Union in order that these facilities could be constructed where there were no alternatives.

The decision to provide a ferry to link the road networks on East and West Falkland are justified by development strategies dating back as far as the 1970s and more recently are in line with discussions on an integrated transport system. There is a political responsibility to ensure the development and survival of all of the Falkland Islands,

not just Stanley. Regarding the Public Jetty, there are alternative facilities in Stanley, and councillors will consider making further investment in this site when a case is put to them by the Tourist Board.

O ASSUMING Dr Davies ceased to be a councillor as soon as he become Acting Chief Medical Officer in 2006:

a. Was he involved in any decision making in that time period as an ExCo member? If so, are the decisions taken/laws still valid/constitupassed tional?

b. If he was not a councillor, has a precedence been set whereby a member of the public can sit in on ExCo meetings and take part in policy decisions?

c. Will he, as a member of the public have to pay back any monies he might have received for attending meetings either here or overseas?

A Attorney General David Pickup answered these questions.

The short answer is that Dr Davies is a member of LegCo, but so far as I am aware, has not been an elected member of ExCo.

But I think the reader was prob-able meaning to refer to LegCo, since they refer to laws passed. On that basis the answers to the three questions are:

(a) By virtue of section 39 of the Constitution, proceedings of LegCo after the date when Dr Davies first acted as Acting CMO after becoming a Councillor are still valid

(b) No - he is not an elected member of ExCo. LegCo sittings are usually in public, and it is possible for non members to participate in LegCo under section 35 of the Constitution.

(c) The repayment of allowances where a seat has been vacated is not covered by the legislation, but given that Dr Davies had no reason to suppose he had vacated his seat, and indeed that he only acted as CMO after he had received the wrong advice on this from FIG, repayment would not seem to be at all appropriate.

Q HOW long would you expect it to take to grade and roll the unsurfaced sections of the Stanley to Mount Pleasant Road if it were necessary at any one time?

Is there a particular prob-lem with the Sapper's Hill to the quarry section which seems to be taking an inordinate length of time to be upgraded?

A Roads Engineer Bob Hancox supplied the following information. Grading can take varying amounts of time depending on what is required, heavy grading and scarifying when the road is in particularly poor condition takes weeks. Light grading or a sweep can be done in just a few days. All grading operations are of course weather susceptible - if too wet and the material is unworkable and will not compact fully when rolled, we have to leave it alone and wait for it to dry, too dry and we need to introduce water to get close to optimum moisture content or again it will not properly compact when rolled which takes time, additional resources and money.

There is no particular technical problem with the section West of Sappers Hill. The time taken to regrade was a combination of the above plus personal commitments that the operator had to deal with.

The standard of the MPA road running surface has been improved considerably over the last few years by the Public Works Department, this in turn raises peoples expecta-tions and if this high standard cannot be maintained for any reason criticism is rapidly heard.

A GROUP of some forty people gathered on Tumbledown Mountain during the pilgrimage to remember the bloody battle that went on there 25 years ago.

A service was held at the cross on the mountain-top on November 16, with appropriate musical accompaniment provided by three pipers

The 'Ode to Tumbledown' was read by Steve Cocks (see text right) and the gathering recited The Lord's Prayer before laying wreaths and crosses on the mountain.

The pipers playing "The Crags of Tumbledown" and three bottles of whiskey were shared among the gathering - half a bottle was poured over the cross for those who died in the battle

Steve was an 18 year old LCPL in the RAPC (Pay Corp) in 1982, six months out of training attached to 2 Scots Guards.

He was the Pay Clerk for Right Flank and as a company they had the responsibility for taking the final third of Tumbledown.

Walking over the mountain after all the years was a great healing experience, Steve said.

He told Penguin News: "For the last 25 years I have had a movie that plays over and over in my head.

"In this movie I replay the events of that night. The stealthy approach, bodies in the grass, being pinned down by snipers, the ripple of air turbulence as bullets pass my head, being showered by dirt from mortars landing close, tracer looping over our heads, the ships on the gunline shelling the other end of the mountain, the agonising cries of the wounded, the hurried assembly of assault platoons, the assault itself and finally the Argentine prisoners."

Walking over the mountain this month allowed him to fill in all the gaps that his memory had left out, Steve said: "For instance, I never really appreciated that Tumbledown was uphill - strange to say, but that's not something that I seemed to have remembered, I always thought Tumbledown was flat!

"I have also seen where everything happened in the calm light of a summer's day with nobody shooting at me and in the company of friends. For me it was a joyous occasion and one that has rounded out the experience for me."

He said he now has an additional layer of memories to overlay the older, sad memories from 1982: "They mesh together, weaving a pattern that makes them complete. I feel so much happier for having done it

Tribute to Islander

During the wreath laying ceremony on Tumbledown Sgt Gordon Hoggan paid tribute to the knowledge and assistance offered to the Guards in recent years by tour guide and Islander Patrick Watts.

Gordon, who in 1982 was with 'G' Company who took the first western feature unopposed, said: "Patrick knows more about the mountain than we do because he has studied the assault route so closely and has information that we were unaware of. He was able to show us, to within a few feet, the position where Sgt Simeon and Guardsman Tambini were killed.

For 25 years many of us have desired to find this location. He has walked the mountain with many veterans and also obtained photographs from England to help him with his research

"Without his help we would be

leaving with still many unanswered questions

Later Sgt Hoggan explained fur-ther: "The problem for us was that

mountain having completed our task, but not knowing what was happening elsewhere, but Patrick has been able to fill in the gaps for us all."

Patrick Watts said he has learned from veterans over the years and used their stories to understand better what went on in the battle

He commented: "I noticed that some guides insist on starting a Tumbledown tour at the east end, walking against the flow of the battle, as far as the highest point and back and not descending to where Left Flank began the assault, sustaining many casualties.

"So now I start my tours at the west end of the mountain and follow the routes taken by 13, 14 and 15 Platoon, pinpointing the position where Major Kizley and 20 men made their famous charge. I've even established the place where the stretcher parties were shelled and two men were killed and several more severely injured.

He added: "I've been fortunate enough to spend many hours on the mountain with veterans from G'Coy, Left and Right Flanks, and HQ Coy.

Ode To Tumbledown

STEVE COCKS recalls: "While I was stationed at Ajax Bay looking after prisoners of war one of the REME Armourers took it upon himself to paint a mural. He really was very talented and as well as painting he made all sorts of bits of furniture out of old pallets. He even made some papier-mache horses and a huge dice with which we used to play horse racing.

The mural consisted of a roll of honour to the dead we suffered on Tumbledown surrounded by cap badges of all the units that were with the Scots Guards that night. He borrowed mine for the Royal Army Pay Corp crest that he painted."

Finally was added the following words:

It was the Guardsmen of the Crown Who scaled the Heights of Tumbledown And fought that night a bloody fight To see victory by dawn's first light. From crag to crag amongst the rock, They skirmished on, numbed by shock. Through shell and mortar fire they moved, Till at last the ground they'd proved Port Stanley lay there ... just ahead, As they began to count their dead. But where the glory, where the pride, Of those eight brave men who died? They who made that lonely sacrifice And through each death paid the total price In their final and heroic act, Did surely speed the warring parties pact. Each one who there his life laid down, Saved countless others from their own unknown. So those of you who live to talk, Let your pride hover as does the hawk. And never let men these acts forget, Nor the memory of our dead neglect, But once returned across this vast sea, Remember then just what it was to be A Scots Guardsman.





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

'FIG needs economic rethink' Former Economic Advisor urges: 'Take a longer term view'

THE Falkland Islands Government (FIG) has done a good job of managing tight budgets in recent difficult financial times, but it has taken its eye off the bigger economic picture.

So says Dr Mike Harte, former Economic Advisor to FIG and author of a report commissioned by the Chamber of Commerce into the government's economic policy.

He believes FIG now needs to take a broader, longer term view of the economy and develop a comprehensive strategy in partnership with the private sector, that accelerates economic development and growth in the Islands.

The Chamber of Commerce commissioned the report following comments on future taxation policy made in the last budget round by councillors and the Financial Secretary during which they increased tax by 5% with no consultation as to the possible effects on the economy.

Dr Harte told *Penguin News* a tax increase out of the blue like this sent the wrong signals to successful businesses and workers.

He commented: "It says we have no long-term plan to increase FIG revenue from a fixed share of a growing economy, instead we will increase our revenue at your expense.

"The sad thing is the tax increase resulted in little extra money to FIG, but caused many businesses and people to doubt that FIG is committed to supporting the private sector."

The private sector, he said, is the future of the economy and cannot be used as "a convenient cash cow" for FIG during difficult financial times.

In his report. Dr Harte recommends a major independent review of the Falkland Islands Meat Company and the sustainability of the meat export industry be commissioned before any further capital investments are made by FIG.

Rural spending?

As for investment in the Camp, Dr Harte commented: "Camp is an important and vibrant part of the Falklands. There are many success stories and successful businesses in Camp. FIG will always have to undertake investment in Camp infrastructure and can't be judged in terms of profitability. This investment should be done in the most cost effective way possible."

Of much more concern, he said, are the "high profile, big ticket" business initiatives that have proven to be a "financial sink hole" for FIG and the Islands: "Even worse, these projects are encouraging Campers to invest in farming activities that have no hope of ever being profitable and will require ongoing significant FIG subsidies. This is at a time when FIG increasingly finds it hard to finance health and education initiatives and Falkland Islands children do not even have a football pitch to play on."

The government needs to have a radical rethink of its approach to the Camp economy, Dr Harte believes: "It needs to support small to medium scale Camp enterprises in farming, tourism and other activities that have sound business plans and the promise of long-term profitability.

"These should be projects that Campers themselves want and support." Continued on page 2

Fishing company's application fails

FALKLANDS fishing company South Atlantic Marine Services Ltd (SAMS) has failed in its application for a judicial review.

SAMS sought to have two decisions made by the Governor regarding quota allocation quashed. The company claimed that their catch during the three year period upon which the quota allocation was calculated was depressed by it having lost a vessel through fire and that to make no adjustment to reflect the fact was unfair, unreasonable and irrational.

The hearing took place over three days before Chief Justice Christopher Gardner QC.

In his judgment released this week he said he was unable to accept that the decisions could be categorised in such a way and that in effect the Governor considered that making an exception in SAMS's case could undermine the administration of the fishing industry as a whole.

IT APPEARS my glee last week at the story that the Environmental Planning Department might be made to remove constructions at Gypsy Cove because they didn't have planning permission was in haste. (It was a great story though, wasn't it?)

Cllr Stevens - currently the caretaker of the environmental portfolio - has informed me that the new information signs do not need planning permission as the laws regulating signs refer to advertisements, their size and whether they are illuminated. The viewing platforms don't either as they are permitted development by virtue of Schedule 2, Part A, Class K Minor Public Works, of the General Development Order which grants planning permission to such structures.

However, you'll be pleased to know there is still a little comic value in the saga of the signs...

A couple of weeks ago, Cllr Summers revealed that a fellow councillor had questioned whether the signage for Gypsy Cove should be reconsidered - they had concerns that the fact the signs were to be put up in both English and Spanish(*) might lead tourists to believe that Spanish is officially the second language of Falkland Islanders. (Some might argue it is!)

This was despite the fact that Executive Council approved the management plan for Gypsy Cove way back in July, in which it is clearly stated that signage would be erected in English and Spanish.

If it was deemed appropriate to have Spanish signs in July - and it must have been, given that the paper was approved - why is it not now?

One really has to wonder how closely councillors read the paper six months ago.

* Most visitors to the Falklands have English as their first language -68 per cent. Spanish/Portuguese speakers are the next biggest group - 13 per cent. The next biggest group is German speakers - 11 per cent, many of whom it could be argued, have a good knowledge of English and don't need their own signs.

DURING last month's meeting of Legislative Council, Cllr Clausen said she wanted to revisit the issue of whether the Falklands should have a single constituency.

A referendum was held on this very issue only six years ago - and the consensus was that the two constituencies should remain.

Can we not just let this issue lie? The people have already spoken.

Tristan illness: not as bad as reported

THE severity of an illness which has struck the remote island of Tristan Da Cunha has been misreported by the UK media, the island's administrator has said.

David Morely says the illness, which was described by the UK press as a viral form of asthma is merely a "rather nasty flu bug" which has worsened the condition of those prone to asthma attacks.

He said a small number of people had been hospitalised and around 100 people on the island were still suffering from the flu. He commented: "The elderly and infirm are bearing the brunt of this, just as they would anywhere else."

Mr Morely said the flu bug was probably brought in to the island by recent visitors: "We are prone to the occasional virus brought in by visitors, just as you are in the Falklands. I guess the community doesn't have the natural immunity to such bugs."

He said the island's stocks of anti-asthma medication are a little lower than they would like but they are coping. He added: "I'm discussing options with the FCO for possible resupply. But we're looking at this in a contingency context, not an emergency context."

Holiday Credit Scheme - will surplus mean an increase?

COUNCILLORS are set to consider whether they will increase the rate at which the Holiday Credit Scheme (HCS) is paid out, at their next meeting of Standing Finance Committee.

When it was first introduced, the HSC was paid out at £1 per day per entitled adult; however, due to budget restraints in recent years it was cut to 50p then to 25p per day.

When the scheme dropped to 25p councillors said the rate would be allocated based on actual budget surpluses.

Now, with the announcement, as reported in *Penguin News* last week, that the government has had a surplus of £5.6m for 2006/07, councillors say they will look at whether the daily rate can be increased.

Penguin News spoke to six of the seven councillors (we were unable to contact ClIr Clausen who is on holiday) - three said they were supportive of an increase.

Cllr Mike Summers said the issue would be up for discussion at the next meeting of Standing Finance Committee. He commented: "What we said was that the allocation of any additional amounts to the HCS should be retrospective, and relate to actual results. Therefore the question is not one for the next budget round, but one for SFC to deal with in relation to last year's actuals, about which we have now had some clearer indication. SFC will therefore consider this matter at its next meeting."

Clir Robertson believed the discussion would be held in the New Year: "We committed ourselves in the 06/07 budget round to looking at allocating holiday credits for that year on the basis of surpluses rather than forecasting forwards. We would expect to have the final figures in January so we will no doubt discuss it then." In previous budget deliberations Cllr Ian Hansen voted against decreasing the Holiday Credit Scheme and voted against its total removal, and he said he would be prepared to support an increase based on the current surplus at the time. He commented: "I would like to see the £1 a day reinstated if possible."

Cllr Richard Cockwell said that as long as the surplus was not just a technical surplus - "and what I mean by that is a paper surplus or because something hasn't been done, which I don't think is the case" councillors should look at increasing the HCS.

He commented: "If we have a genuine surplus and if there is financial justification for putting it up I would support it - I have always supported the concept of the scheme."

Cllr Richard Stevens said he had argued against the abolition of the HCS and for its importance to certain sectors of the community. He commented: "I will be supporting the decision to reassess it if we have a healthy surplus, but by how much is a discussion that we will have."

He added: "There are other important areas where people would like us to invest. The Public Jetty and surrounding area, tarmac on the MPA road and a Deep Water Jetty to name three.

"It will be argued that investing in these areas will help develop our economy which in turn will allow us to maintain or expand the services we now enjoy rather that continually look for savings, and inevitably lose such things as the holiday credit scheme."

Councillor Mike Rendell said that as the level of daily payments was reduced from 50p to 25p at the last budget session he assumed it would be the 25p difference that would be up for discussion.

Continued from front page FIG could and should support Camp businesses during difficult early days until they find their feet, he said - however, the support should not be unlimited: "If they are still staggering like the town drunk some five or more years later, it's probably time to pull the plug on supporting their wealth-destroying habit."

Dr Harte believes the Falkland Islands have great opportunities for economic growth and development, but he added: "There is no easy money any more. Economic development will occur because of the hard work and creativity of the private sector and committed workers. FIG has to realise its role is to support economic excellence. It has a less than successful record of running profitable and sustainable business."

President of the Chamber of Commerce Council, Roger Spink, said the Chamber recognised that in general the annual budget of the Islands has been well managed. They commissioned the report because they saw issues that they felt were not in the best interests of the future economy of the Islands if councillors followed them. He commented: "We decided to get a report that would stimulate debate and raise questions that should assist councillors in formulating future policy."

Mr Spink said FIG was recognising the need for change with the recruitment of an Economist and the fact that councillors took the time to meet with the Chamber and discuss the issues raised in the report, describing this as "a welcome and positive step".

and positive step". He added: "We wish to continue to work in a constructive and open manner with our elected representatives to ensure continued investment and the future prosperity of the Islands. We hope to hold regular meetings with councillors and members of the administration to ensure they are aware of the effects that their policies and actions may have on the private sector." Tourists flock to Stanley

THE Falklands experienced its busiest ever cruise ship day on Tuesday, welcoming 3,779 passengers from three vessels to Stanley.

The Infinity, Discovery and Norwegian Dream completed their first visit to the Falklands of the season amid mixed weather conditions. The last count conducted by Port Security at 1.30pm - the point at which passengers began to return to their vessels - revealed that 3,779 passengers chose to come ashore, equivalent to 94% of all available passengers.

FITB General Manager Jake Downing commented that despite the large demands placed on operators and local residents, the day was a great success.

He said firm management and a cooperative approach from tour operators ensured that traffic in the Jetty Visitor Centre car park (the starting point for most passenger tours), flowed well with few congestion issues. He added: "Similarly, the car park surface stood up to the rigors of weather and use, with little evidence of the day's activities present at the close of business.

The Royal Falkland Islands Police deployed two additional officers on the day to deal with the influx of visitors, but were pleased to report no major incidents. Even the lunchtime rush of vehicles was event-free, with drivers displaying great courtesy and patience.

As it was the busiest day on record the Tourist Board took the

opportunity to survey passengers on their satisfaction with public amenities and general perceptions of the Falklands.

Initial results showed that the majority of passengers found their Falklands experience enjoyable, but would like to see more shelter for tourists (particularly when waiting for tenders), as well as more eateries providing quick snacks.

Despite a weak US dollar the Jetty Visitor Centre experienced its third biggest day of sales in the past two seasons, with other local retailers expected to report similar results.

Guilty pleas to drugs charges

TWO men entered guilty pleas to drugs charges in the Senior Magistrate's Court on Monday.

Luke Griffin (21), a reserve police officer at the time of the offence, pleaded guilty to possessing a small quantity of cannabis while Alastair Ceballos pleaded guilty to supplying a controlled substance.

Both cases were adjourned until today (Friday) for medical reports to be accessed.

Crown Prosecution Julia Kraehling-Smith said that Mr Griffin's name had cropped up while police were investigating the availability of cannabis in Stanley.

A small quantity (0.9 grams) was discovered in a side pocket of a suitcase in Mr Griffin's room and he was subsequently arrested and interviewed under caution.

She said he had assisted police with where he had obtained the illegal substance and that he had paid £20 for a small amount, estimated to be at a street value somewhat higher than the UK, for his personal use.

Ms Kraehling -Smith said the offence was made more serious by the fact that he was employed as a reserve police officer, a position of authority and trust.

Defence lawyer David Lang explained that Mr Griffin had arrived in the Islands in July 2005. Personal difficulties, combined with being subject to an investigation about an escaped prisoner along with other police officers, had caused his client a lot of stress, he said. He added: "Instead of going to the appropriate people he decided to obtain cannabis."

The case was adjourned until Friday for medical records to be obtained so that the Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson could better ascertain the issues surrounding the case.

Alastair Ceballos was also released on bail to reappear on Friday, for medical reports to be accessed.

Defence lawyer Richard Marlor said his client has suffered depression in the past and he may still be suffering from it.

No details of the incident were given.

Teenage alcohol charge dropped

A teenage girl has had a charge against her of consuming alcohol in a private place dropped.

In court yesterday the prosecution dropped the charge saying that after the time which had lapsed between the alleged "minor" offence and the trial, it was no longer in the public's interest to proceed.

Defence counsel Richard Marlor said there was more to the situation, that, had the matter come to trial, he had intended to raise issues with regard to how the incident had been handled by the police. He said, for instance, the defendant and her mother were never asked to give their version of what had happened.

A verdict of not guilty was recorded by the Senior Magistrate.

March trials for men facing sex charges

STANLEY man Simon Reid has pleaded not guilty to two charges of sexual activity with a child.

The offences are alleged to have taken place in June and August.

Mr Reid was arrested and remanded in custody last month and then released on conditional bail.

Appearing in court on Wednesday his bail conditions were reinforced to further restrict any contact with the complainant.

Crown Counsel Julia Kraehling-Smith made the application following a complaint to the police that Mr Reid was persistently driving past the complainant, making her feel "worried and intimidated."

Defence lawyer Richard Marlor said the allegation needed looking into further and could be an attempt to "make trouble" for his client.

The trial is scheduled to take place in March on a date to be agreed by counsel and the Senior Magistrate to coincide with prosecution and defence counsel from the UK visiting for the trial of a man charged with the rape of a child under 13.

This man, who cannot be named for legal reasons, has opted to stand trial before judge and jury.

His trial is scheduled for March 10.

Article gives woman courage to go to police

FOLLOWING last Fridays' Penguin News article concerning domestic violence the police arrested a man after an alleged domestic assault on Sunday night.

The man cannot be identified at this stage prior to charges which are currently being considered by the Attorney General's Chambers.

Superintendent Paul Elliott commented: "Whilst I am saddened that a domestic assault has taken place, I am very pleased that following on from last week's *Penguin News* article on domestic abuse, the lady who was assaulted has had the courage to report the matter to the police."

He said the police had responded "sensitively" and in accordance with their domestic violence policy. He added: "We hope that as well as dealing with the immediate issue, the couple involved will see this as a positive turning point in their relationship.

"I encourage any person, male or female, who is suffering domestic violence in a relationship to come to the police for support."

Cllr Stevens: 'There are complex issues behind teacher dissatisfaction'

THE issues behind teacher dissatisfaction at the Community School are "complex" according to Councillor Richard Stevens

He said morale had been low at the school for a number of years although the lack of a head teacher and the way the restructuring proposals were first introduced had not helped. He commented: "We do not have the luxury in schools, particularly in the Falkland Islands where there aren't any alternatives, to wait for the opportune moment, [to introduce the proposals] if such a moment would ever exist."

The problems at FICS were "complex and inter related" and the solutions are equally so, he said.

Some teachers had privately expressed dissatisfaction at the way the inspection report was released - before staff were able to correct any factual inaccuracies - and this was commented on by the Editor of *Penguin News*, Jenny Cockwell, last week. Councillor Stevens commented: "On the one hand govemment are under constant pressure for openness, and on the other there is the fact that the unpalatable conclusions can cause damage within organisations.

"Unfortunately we work to set guidelines when it comes to openness and no one in government can pick and choose what becomes a public document – even if a department would very much like to."

In her comment column, Mrs Cockwell recounted a story of a pupil taking a copy of the report to school and telling a teacher it was critical of staff - before staff had seen the report. Cllr Stevens commented: "It is disappointing that a parent chose to print this report and arm their child with it rather than look for more constructive avenues to help rather than hinder what is after all a community institution.

"A partnership between families, the community as a whole and the schools can help to improve discipline."

Mrs Cockwell urged better communication between school staff and management and Cllr Stevens said this was already happening. He explained: "Certainly as councillors all three of us on the Education portfolio have visited the schools, Councillor Robertson and myself on a number of occasions.

"[We have gone] with the Director of Education on some occasions, with the previous Chief Executive on another and just as councillors at other times, trying to reassure staff that the current initiatives were not a slight on anyone, but a way of developing, evolving and moving forward and dealing imaginatively with difficult children."

He added: "We will continue to make ourselves available in and out of school to discuss all the issues. We currently meet with all heads on the penultimate Monday of every term, and attended the second night of the FICS concert."

FIH report 'encouraging results'

FALKLAND Islands Holdings have released their interim results with "encouraging" results achieved from Falklands businesses.

Chairman, David Hudd, says the group has continued to make good progress during the period.

"Particularly encouraging were the improved results from the fishing agency, whilst the re-organisation of the retailing and DIY businesses should strengthen customer appeal," he said.

Subsidiary company FOGL has continued to move forward with the completion of a successful exploration programme and the introduction of BHP Billiton as a partner. The farm out secures the drilling of two wells on the acreage and FOGL is now funded through a significant proportion of the near term exploration programme.

Billiton will increase its interest to 51% from the 40% announced in October, while FOGL retains a substantial stake in the licences.

BHP Billiton will pay FOGL an additional US\$2.75 million in reimbursement of historical costs.

"BHP Billiton's decision to increase its interests in our licences further confirms our view that the south and east Falkland basins are highly prospective and have the potential of the discovery of significant volumes of oil and gas," said Tim Bushell, FOGL Chief Executive.

West Falkland assistance call

THE police have thanked volunteers who rushed to the aid of a mystery radio caller.

On Sunday evening a two metre radio call was picked up at Fox Bay from a distressed woman; at the time the police were concerned that she may have been involved in an accident and could have been trapped or injured.

Having been alerted about the call by Fox Bay, but with no idea of where the woman actually was, police contacted farm managers and people living in settlements



across Lafonia and West Falkland to request they drive along roads in those areas in an effort to trace the woman.

Superintendent Paul Elliott said everybody who was asked responded immediately and the woman was quickly traced near to Little Chartres. Although she was distressed and shaken she was not injured.

Helen Wallace, who was spending some time at Chartres, had got wire tangled around the wheel of the vehicle she was driving and was unable to remove the wire or move the vehicle. Unfamiliar with the area and with the prospect of a night out alone looking likely, she became upset and put out a call on the 2-metre radio.

Helen said she was very grateful that so many people went to such efforts to ensure her safety, "I really appreciate it," she said.

Officers at the police station have tried to call back to thank all those who went out in their vehicles and Supt Elliott also expressed his thanks. He commented: "I was impressed at the willingness and enthusiasm of everyone contacted to help at a moments notice.

"Thanks to you all."

November: a cold month with lots of rain

By the MPA Met Office NOVEMBER was a cold month with well below average temperatures.

Rainfall was twice the average but sunshine hours were very near average. Wind speeds were below average but there were more days of gales than average. There were a record number of days of hail.

The mean maximum temperature for November was 10.5C, well below the long term average of 12.9C. The highest temperature recorded was 21.7 C on the 30th and the lowest maximum was 4.8C on the 3rd. The mean minimum temperature was 2.4C, well below the long term average of 4.1C. The lowest minimum was -2.2C on the 3rd and the highest minimum of 8C was recorded on the 30th.

Rainfall was well above average for the month, with a total of 74.7mm, against the normal for Oc-

tober of 36.8mm. The wettest day was the 17th with 18.8mm.

There were 11 days when snow or sleet fell and 15 days when hail was reported. There was one day, the 2nd, when snow was reported lying and also one day of thunder.

There were 214.5 hours of sunshine, very near the average of 214.1 hours. The highest daily total was 14.6 hours on the 27th. There were no days when no sunshine was recorded.

The monthly mean wind speed was 15.2 knots, slightly below the average for November of 16.2 knots. The highest hourly mean speed of 38 knots occurred once and the highest gust of 53 knots, occurred twice on the 16th and 19th.

Gales were recorded on seven days, above the average of 4.4.

'So much for open government'

SOME weeks ago in your editorial following the appointment of the new Chief Executive you questioned the process and, "...the wisdom of the final choice being solely up to councillors."

You commented that they might be tempted to opt for a candidate who they feel they can bend to their way of thinking. You also posed the other argument that the Chief Executive's role is to implement the decisions of the elected representatives. Your preference was to see the appointment made by a panel.

The final Report on the Review of the Constitution sets out where our councillors stand on this subject. The Report recommends that appointments of the Chief Executive, Attorney General, Financial Secretary, Chief of Police, OC FIDF and Director Civil Aviation are to be made by the Governor having consulted Executive Council. though he would be free not to accept that advice, except in the case of the Chief Executive where the Governor must accept the advice of Executive Council

There are options regarding the appointment to the Chief Executive post and it is a pity that there was so little public discussion on the process. In fact there was very little real public debate on the Constitutional Review at all, mainly because our councillors failed to spark any. This is a serious shortcoming in the review process. It would have been helpful if we knew where individual councillors stood on various aspects of the Review of our Constitution however the Select Committee refused to publish the minutes of their discussions. All we got was the consensus view. So much for the open government we were promised.

More worrying, however, is councillors' approach regarding other appointments in the public service. The report says "Select Committee respects the age old UK civil service mantra that politicians should not be involved in the appointment and dismissal of public servants, to ensure that nepotism and corruption continue to be avoided.

I am sure that in our small community we all agree with that. Particularly the bit about those in power not showing favouritism to relatives or close friends. However councillors then turn this age old mantra on its head and recommend that "appointments of Heads of Departments should be delegated to the Chief Executive who should (that means 'must') consult Executive Council though he would be free not to take their advice." This is most disturbing. Civil Servants particularly those on contracts will be under pressure to give advice they expect Members want rather than an independent professional view. When contract review comes up, dissent will be seen as not toeing the line with the potential for no renewal.

In a House of Commons Research Paper titled The Falkland Islands - 25 Years On -published in March this year, Bill Rammell MP is quoted, "Moreover, whilst standards in governance in some territories are high, in others there is room for improvement-and some of the smaller territories lack the institutional capacity and experience to cope well with the increasing demands on Government. Equally, the lack of a developed civil society, strong legislature, and vibrant media in some territories also means that many of the usual checks on the Executive can be weaker than normal." I wonder where he had in mind. The Falklands certainly lacks a strong legislature, we long for a vibrant media, and there is no scrutiny of the Executive.

He then went on to say: "And, in the context of the constitutional reviews. I shall have to make it clear that we shall look very cautiously at any proposal that might undermine the political neutrality of the public service or independence of the judiciary in the OTs

I don't believe that councillors will be able to resist exerting influence when appointments arise. They have already intervened, both publicly and behind the scenes, in an appointment to a post outside of government - remember the saga over the appointment of the General Manager of the Tourist Board so what will they be prepared to do with posts inside government? Other things could happen if they haven't already. Imagine if councillors were to influence an officer granting work permits for example.

We can only hope that the FCO will note this issue when its officials visit shortly. Unfortunately we can't tell them of our concerns as we have been instructed by the spokesperson for our elected representatives not to lobby them.

Artist's 1982-inspired exhibition: 'Don't worry, it's not all depressing'

LOCAL artist James Peck is to exhibit work he completed in late 2006 and early 2007.

The works, which will be shown in the Community School on December 9 and 10, were finished while James was in Sydney and Buenos Aires and have previously been exhibited as part of his degree show at the National Art School in Sydney.

The works depict the artist's reaction to and reflection on the 25th anniversary of the Falklands war and the passing of his father, Terry Peck who left Stanley in 1982 and hid in the Camp before meeting up with British Forces and assisting them as a guide.



From a horseback commute to telephone lessons - 40 years with Camp Ed

By Sharon Jaffray WHEN 19 year-old Richard Fogerty set out on his first teaching mission in the Falklands, all the tools of the trade fitted in a set of maletas (saddlebaes)

Forty years on education for children living in the Camp has changed dramatically and Richard has been there almost every step of the way.

It's a long way from his early working life, roofing and steeple jacking in Salisbury. In 1968 he spotted two adverts in a newspaper while waiting for his boss outside a bookies. One was for a game warden's job in Kenya and the other for a travelling teacher in the Falkland Islands he responded to both. The Kenyans never replied but the Falklands, who were looking for unqualified teachers who would fit into farming communities, did and Richard was soon southbound on the RMS Darwin,

Sailing into Stanley harbour on a foggy day in 1968 the first things to make an impression on Richard was the smell of peat smoke in the air and the rubbish dump which was directly opposite the Narrows. "It was quite eerie really." he said.

After a week in Stanley where he lodged with Jenny Macaskill and undertook some training, he set out for Port Stephens to meet his class of 12. The pupils ranged from five to 14 years old, so at 19 there was little difference in the teacher and pupils' ages. During the week he taught the likes of Mike McRae, Robert Short and the Street children the 'three Rs'. and on the weekends they taught him basic Falklands skills like gosling chasing and horse and motorbike rid-

Richard said the system worked well: "There was a very basic curriculum to work from and resources were limited. Books would arrive from the Ranfurly Library Service and I would get what I could from them, you had to be adaptable and flexible."

He also had to teach on Weddell Island and when Kelp Creek was added to his beat he was given an old horse to make his way there.

He recalled: "I'd never been on a horse before and I couldn't get it to move, so eventually I took the gear off, hung it on the fence and walked, but I became determined that I was going to get the hang of it."

When he shared this aspiration with Ted Dickson and Texas Short. two characters at Port Stephens, after a few drinks they decided to select an untamed colt for Richard and teach him from scratch. "They got the horses in and were looking for one with pin ears (when the ears look like they will touch at the top) as that was supposedly the sign of a really bad one - thankfully they were too drunk to catch it," said Richard.

The one they did manage to catch turned out to be a wonderful introduction into the world of colt taming and he soon made a name for himself as a good horseman.

It was undoubtedly duite an adventure for a young man fresh from the UK. "People just got stuck into everything and that is what I tended to do," he recalled.

Five years later he took up the post of settlement teacher/storekeeper and book keeper at Port Stephens, supplementing his income with wool pressing contracts and other farm work.


"It was an active lifestyle, people worked hard and played hard and we thought nothing of taking the tractor and sleigh and travelling 11 hours to Fox Bay in the winter because there was a dance on or somebody was going to be playing the guitar," he

Richard travelled to the UK in 1979 where he undertook training at Brighton Polytechnic. Funding was offered to him by the Falklands' Government, but because he wanted to keep his options open he opted to pay for it himself. He obtained his Bachelor of Education and kept his training geared to what could be useful in the Falklands.

With the Falklands war breaking out. Richard decided it was not a

good time to return to the Islands more responsible for their children's with his six year old son Phillip. He undertook some probationary work, a move that he felt then, and retrospectively, was important for his ca-

However two years later the call of the Falklands got the better of him and he returned on board the Uganda. He took up a post as classroom teacher in the Infant and Junior School to provide cover for a couple of terms and then moved to Goose Green as settlement teacher, taking over from Andy Clarke.

This was the beginning of radio lessons for Richard and also the start of a new era for teaching Camp children

Up until this point children were visited every four to six weeks with work being set for the periods without a teacher. Some pupils would diligently do their homework, others would rush it through the night before the travelling teacher returned and on occasion it didn't get done at

With daily contact between teacher and pupil, made possible Island wide with the introduction of repeater stations on mountain tops for the two-metre radio systems, there was a new pressure on both pupils and parents to keep up to date with work

Richard was a firm favourite with the children and his story telling over the open radio at the end of each lesson was popular with not only them. but also parents and often the military personnel stationed on the mountain top sites. He recalled how on occasion when he would split a story into instalments there would be adult voices come over the air waves imploring him to continue.

This was ground breaking stuff in what had been an area with very limited resources, but could be restricting for parents who had become far education than in a normal learning environment

Getting a five or six-year-old to pay attention to a little black box and not press the microphone while the teacher was giving instructions alone could be quite stressful but, as with the colt taming Richard developed a firm but fun technique that would soon have the youngest child into a routine and even looking forward to lessons

From my own experience, weaning a child off the early lessons with Richard were the problem, when the time came that they were allocated another teacher. My daughter Sammy would sit on the stairs and refuse to come out for a lesson unless she heard the dulcet tones of 'Mr Fog' and then would quite happily regale him with

stories of her Shetland pony's antics and, on occasion, even do some sums. At this time, standards in the edu-

cation of Camp children really began to rise. Phyl Rendell was the Director of Education at the time and she made an enquiry to the New Zealand Education Gazette about teachers. Unbeknown to her they ran an advert and suddenly there were New Zealand teachers wanting to come to the Islands. Richard explained that these teachers could easily get sabbaticals, were experienced and Camp education were able to take full advantage of their knowledge.

"It was a watershed in a way for Camp - the standard began to rise and Camp children were gradually being judged on equal terms with Stanley children," said Richard

The numbers of children in Camp

are dwindling with 19 now receiving education. This has been a gradual decline: 25 years ago there were approximately 50 children and ten years ago about 30.

The introduction of roads has helped children get together more now than they did in the early days of Camp Education. Children of a similar age gather in a settlement and jointly take advantage of a visiting teacher. They also get the chance. when in town, to attend school whenever possible, Richard said.

Meanwhile, radio lessons have become telephone lessons and with improving telecommunications systems look set to keep moving with the times. "Video conference-type lessons could even be an option for the future," said Richard.

After almost 18 years as Camp

Education Supervisor, Richard is now preparing to leave the department he helped shaped and watched grow over the last four decades - he will take up the newly created post of Assistant Director of Education in the New Year.

The support and friendliness of everyone in the Islands is what kept

him here, he said. "Particularly people like Ann and Peter Robertson at Port Stephens in the early days and all the families in Camp through the years - I can relate to and identify with them.


In his new role he will support Director of Education Barbara Booth - "I will be overseeing performance management and CPD (Continued Professional Development), collecting and integrating data, school improvements...and much more."

He will be sad to leave Camp Education, a job that has given him a great insight into rural life, as his involvement with the department will be no more than with the other schools.

"Camp Education will in theory be part of the primary school so I will not be as directly involved as 1 am now, but I will be involved in terms of the whole school improvement and management side of it."

The integration of the departments will be a challenge, he said; "It will be balancing and meeting needs of the children and families in Camp and the needs of running a mainstream primary school."

In the little time not taken up by his work in the Education Department, Richard works on his stone cottage home. He also likes to read and is in the middle of doing a Masters Degree. He added: "Sometimes I just fantasise about going back out into Camp and the peace and quiet."



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
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
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

Q IN his role as a councillor, Richard Davies sat on the Select Committee for the Review of the Constitution. He states that the Constitution is quite clear that a person cannot act as Chief Medical Officer and be a councillor.

Will he please explain fully why having looked at the Constitution in depth he felt he had to ask the Chief Executive for advice on something which he states is quite clear?

A Dr Davies provided this answer.

What I said in my press release was this: "In June 2006 I signed a new contract which required me to act in the capacity of CMO if requested. I was uneasy about doing so in view of the potential conflicts of interest. and I raised this with my managers".

The Constitutional ordinance (section 53) lists Chief Medical Officer (CMO) and Deputy CMO as 'barred' posts for Councillors. The role of Acting CMO is not specified in the Ordinance or the Management Code. Acting CMO was a new post, introduced because the Deputy CMO post was made redundant. It involves a medical officer temporarily assuming extra responsibility in the CMO's absence. Unlike the other two posts, it never involved acting as Head of Department, so there is a significant difference.

Nevertheless. I did think that it might be inappropriate for me to act up as CMO and so I asked that specific question. It is appropriate to consult one's managers and Human Resources when negotiating a contract, but I was given incorrect advice on this occasion.

To interpret the Constitution properly, the Constitutional Ordinance needs to be cross-referenced with sections 24 and 25 of the Constitution. Both documents are written in legal language and legal advice may be required for their interpretation. I assumed my managers had consulted the Attorney General designate before advising me on this issue. Whether they did this or not is unclear.

It was well known to the Chief Executive, Attorney General Designate, Director of Health Services, Chief Medical Officer and Human Resources staff that I was a Councillor and that I was required to act as CMO on occasion. I had raised my concerns with them and discussed how to minimise conflicts of interest. Nevertheless it was not until I raised the issue with Dr Blanch 18 months later that I got correct advice. This illustrates that it was not 'quite clear' at the time.

Furthermore, I would like to say again that I have not resigned or stepped down from the job I was elected to do in 2005. However, there appears to be no way that I can regain my seat apart from by winning a by-election.

If I am re-elected, in the future the medical department will cover the CMO's absences without extra cost, or requiring me to act unconstitutionally.

Q What assurances can Richard Davies give the electorate that he has paid full attention to all the other parts of the Constitution during the course of the Review?

A I paid full attention during our deliberations and studied both the Constitution and the records of the previous Council's discussions carefully. The Constitution needs to be interpreted with good legal advice, as the current fiasco demonstrates. The Select Committee for the Review of the Constitution was advised by the Attorney General during the review. This ensured that councillors were clear about the meaning of the Constitution, and that any changes proposed were clearly worded without ambiguity.

Q I UNDERSTAND there is a policy of no mobile phones in school. Why is it therefore that my child's teacher has been using his phone at school - even during class? Is this a 'studentonly' policy?

A Director of Education, Barbara Booth responded to this question.

There is a no mobile phone policy for all schools and it applies to all staff and students. The only concession within this policy is that staff may use their phone in the staff room at break time or during a non-contact period in FICS. The use of mobile phones would also be permissible if there were to be an emergency and other routes of communication were unavailable, although this is unlikely.

Should your correspondent feel able to provide me or the Headteacher concerned with more information then the issue which has been raised could be looked into more thoroughly.

The following programme has been arranged for Saturday 8th December 2007 to commemorate the victory of the Naval engagements of 8th December 1914 on which day 6 British sailors lost their lives and a number of others died later from injuries received during the battle. 2,260 German sailors also lost their lives.

At 10.58 His Excellency the Governor will arrive at the Battle Memorial and will inspect the Parade. After prayers, he, a Councillor, the Commander British Forces will lay wreaths, as will others. After the ceremony at the Battle Memorial there will be a march past. His Excellency the Governor will take the Salute from a dais at the entrance gates to Government House lawns.

A MIXED market this week with prices hovering similar to last weeks sales

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) finished at 421.8 pence per kilogram clean, up slightly compared with last week's 420.3p/kg.

Extremely good fine wools (18 and 19 micron) that were available for sale pushed the price up at the finer end of the market.

A large sale of over 68,000 bales is expected in Australia next week. which some analysts have cited as the reason for several buyers holding back on the last sale day of this week. There will be 10,000 bales up for sale in South Africa next week also.

Linked to this, clearance rates were lower than in previous weeks with Australian sales turning in 13.2% of bales offered while in South Africa and New Zealand, 87% of bales changed hand0s.


This team event produces the sort of golf you dream of playing, accompanied by pressure like you have never experienced before, so get out practicing and join up before someone gets in ahead of you.



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Historic rock arrives at memorial

A BLOCK of Falklands stone that will hold the centre piece of a monument to mark the Royal Marine Corps' long association with the Falklands was helicoptered in to the Stanley Triangle on Thursday.

Access to remote islands restricted

THREE island airstrips have had flights restricted solely to "servicing the essential social needs of the islands."

This comes as a result of Air Safety Support regulations, confirmed Director of Civil Aviation Andrew Newman.

The remote islands of Beaver, West Point and New Island are those most affected by the regulations

Mr Newman explained, "The flight operations regulator for FIGAS is Air Safety Support International (ASSI) in the UK. As part of their regulatory audits they have been assessing the criteria that FIGAS apply to operate the Islander aircraft into camp airstrips, specifically those that are of a marginal nature due to locations, runway length, slope and obstacles.

"The Falkland Islands Government and FIGAS have always imposed limitations to this type of airstrip. Additionally FIGAS operate the aircraft in a manner which provides the best possible safety margins such as weight restrictions, weather conditions, runway surface conditions etc.

"However ASSI have identified the three island airstrips as requiring flights to be restricted solely to servicing the essential social needs of the islands. These restrictions will continue at least until late January 2008 when ASSI will be undertaking an independent audit of those three airstrips.

"During this time the limitations imposed to operate to marginal airstrips must be strictly adhered to."

Dion Poncet of Beaver Island said he very much hoped that the situation would result in a report on all three strips aimed at, finding out what can be done to improve them."

He said he understood the restrictive regulations were a last ditch attempt to keep the strips open, "...but it's ridiculous to say it is OK to be killed on that airstrip it you live there.

"Basically we've had our social life reduced to zero."

Monte mishap causes Norwegian Dream to cancel

LESS than a month after the Explorer sank in Antarctic waters, Falklands cruise ship tourism has taken another knock with cruise ship Norwegian Dream suffering damage in the Uruguayan port of Montevideo.

Norwegian Dream had to miss out Stanley as a port of call this voyage (due to arrive today) after a collision with a barge loaded with containers.

The cruise vessel, carrying 1,700 passengers, was leaving the port of Montevideo when it collided with the barge which was 'adrift' in the entrance channel.

Norwegian Cruise Line spokeswoman Susan Robison has been reported as saying the overall safety of the vessel was not compromised.

The Paraguayan flagged barge also suffered damage and several containers and some vehicles tumbled into the shallow River Plate estuary. The ship remained afloat.

Managing Director of Sulivan Shipping in Stanley, John Pollard, confirmed: "As a result of the need to make repairs to the vessel at the same port, Norwegian Dream will no longer call at the Falkland Islands or Puerto Madryn as it will need to make up time in order to arrive promptly at Valparaiso in Chile for the passenger turna-round."

Sulivan Shipping is the agent for the Norwegian Dream.

Two other vessels that regularly visit the Islands, The Marco Polo and the Infinity have been caught up in the melee.

The Infinity was unable to leave the port following the accident and due to the floating containers and the danger from sunken vehicles. For the same reason the Marco Polo was last heard to be waiting to

Their Falklands schedules are unlikely to be affected, however, as they are not due to visit the islands during their current voyage. Tourist Board General Manager

Jake Downing said, "I don't view the incident in Montevideo as a set back for Falkland Islands tourism.

"With the growth of the cruise ship market, we would expect, unfortunately, the number of cancellations to increase proportionately with growth. If however we were to start experiencing a string of cancellations due to issues within our control then we should start to be concerned."

A fourth 'Falklands visitor' the Clipper Adventurer has encountered engine trouble during her latest voyage, however, she is not due in the Islands until January 5.

Rockhopper Exploration pic will acquire further 2D seismic data in the North Falklands Basin commencing on 16 December 2007. The survey will be undertaken by the seismic survey vessel "Bergen Surveyor", radio call sign LACS5 (LIMA ALPHA CHARLIE SIERRA FIVE). Depending on prevailing weather conditions, data acquisition is expected to take about 10 days to complete.

Seismic data will be acquired over the Weddell Prospect. The survey area is bounded by the following coordinates

From time-to-time and for operational reasons the "Bergen Surveyor" may manoeuvre outside of the survey grid area.

The 'Bergen Surveyor' will be towing a single 6000 metre seismic cable. The end of the cable will be marked by a floating buoy fitted with a flashing white light. The vessel has a RED painted hull and a BEIGE painted superstructure.

The "Bergen Surveyor" is to be given a wide berth by all other vessels. Vessels shall not pass within 7500 metres astern or 1000 metres abeam or forward of the "Bergen Surveyor". Securite messages will be broadcast twice daily by the "Bergen Surveyor" at 09:30 hours local time and 21:30 hours local time on HF radio 4066.1kHz. Fishing vessels working in the vicinity of the survey area or all other vessels transiting near to the survey area, should maintain a good listening watch on VHF radio Channel 16 at all times.

Fire Service and Antarctic Research Trust benefit from family's generous donation

THE Antarctic Research Trust (ART) have made a generous donation to the Fire and Rescue Service to say thanks for their help with fire fighting in the past, in particular on Green Island.

The £2,500 contribution came from a generous donation to the Trust by the Micheli family who visited the Falklands in January 2004, and witnessed first-hand the consequences of fire on Green Island, a small tussac island near Mare Harbour.

"The Fire and Rescue Service and volunteers including military personnel from Mount Pleasant Airport, put a huge amount of time, effort and equipment into fighting the fire and saving the island's tussac and wildlife," said the Island's owner Sally Poncet. Discussions between Sally and the Micheli family resulted in a contribution to tussac island conservation and protection in the form of a donation to the ART.

"As owners of the tussac islands Sea Lion Easterly, Whisky, Rum and Brandy islands near Sea Lion Island, the ART is very grateful for this donation and hope it will be of benefit to all land owners in the Islands," said Sally.

A very grateful Mr Fiddes assured that the funds would be put to good use, purchasing portable equipment suitable for the task of fighting fires in remote areas.

Although the donation is the result of an environmental disaster it will also be beneficial for those living in Camp who may call upon the Fire Service, he said.

Cllr Summers: Student's flights only sticking point in airbridge negotiations

THE cost of flights for students and children is the only sticking point in the negotiations on the airbridge between the Government and the Ministry of Defence/ Foreign and Commonwealth teams.

Speaking to *Penguin News* Councillor Mike Summers, who recently returned from the Ninth Overseas Territories Consultative Council, said, "The negotiations went well and a number of points were cleared and objectives achieved. There remain a few matters to clear up before we can reach a final conclusion, in particular how we deal with student/child fares which currently we get at 50% of adult price from the MoD.

"Their revised position is that all seats have to be paid for at full cost recovery, and it will be for us to work out how that can be done by varying the selling prices of other seats. Given the numbers of students flying this is not easy to achieve and we continue to look for alternative options with FCO/ MoD."

He added: "We are unlikely to agree full implementation of any new arrangements until after the outcome is known of the new tendering process for the airbridge for a new contract (Sept 08 to Sept 11). In practice this probably means mid year sometime."

The Falkland Islands Government have been negotiating with the MoD/FCO team with regard to a proposal involving them selling the FIG a number of airbridge seats according to the former's demand. FIG would then sell them on to their customers.

The move is part of renegotiations on the Joint Position Statement which covers the operation of the airbridge.

EXPERTS are questioning the official explanation of why Explorer sank as she did. The vessel sank near the South Shetland Islands and the Antarctic peninsula called Graham Land in late November.

The ship was widely believed to have sank after she developed a fistsized leak when she hit an iceberg. But the position and size of the hole has led many to question this version of events and there are suspicions that there may have been more than one impact; several passengers reported they heard two bangs.

A former captain of the vessel, Leif Skog, says it is highly unlikely that pack-ice caused the ship to sink because the vessel was outstanding in her design and perfect for icenavigation.

Doubts were reinforced by the images of the stricken ship listing directly onto her starboard side. This suggests she was holed mid-ship; but any damage resulting from an ice-impact would normally be found in the bow.

Since the Explorer was built with a reinforced hull designed to with-stand accidental ice-impact, Captain Skog and others speculate it was not ice, but rock, that caused the damage.

He commented to ABC News: "There can be huge rocks frozen into the ice, and they can be hard to see

Sander Calisal, professor Emeritus of Naval Architecture at the University of British Colombia has stated that whatever the ship hit it should not have sunk. The ship's watertight compartments should have contained the flooding if it were a case of just one leak. All of the suspicions have lead

to speculation that there was a second collision as the vessel drifted while engineers worked to contain the initial breach. MP/PN

HMS Nottingham refused entry to Montevideo

ROYAL Naval Destroyer HMS Nottingham was refused a request to refuel in Montevideo, Uruguay, on December 10, confirmed HQ BFFI this week.

HMS Nottingham was due to visit Montevideo from December 10-14 as part of the UK contribution to the centenary celebrations of the Uruguayan Naval Academy

"The Uruguayan authorities asked the ship not to come," said Squadron Leader Simon Barnes (Media Operations HQBFFI).

The refusal was reported in Argentine press reports and confirmed by the secretary to Uruguay's Foreign Affairs Minister

It is believed that the Argentine Ambassador in Montevideo Patiño

Meyer requested that Nottingham not be refueled in Montevideo. The authorisation had been granted previously and was cancelled on December 8

The minister's secretary said that if it had been a "courtesy visit", there would have been, "no impediments.

However, since the request was specifically for refueling it was denied at last moment on Argentina's request

A BURGLARY at the Pink Shop and drinking before permitted hours in a Stanley pub were two scenarios faced by Royal Falkland Islands Police probationers last month.

Sergeant Tom Whistler explained, "The officers began the course on November 5, 2007 receiving tuition on all policing issues, from powers of arrest, road policing through to sexual offences and the use of discretion.

The course is designed to test the student's knowledge, understanding and interpretation of the law and their ability to put theory into practice said Sergeant Whistler.

The five week course concluded with practical assessments in the fifth week, which ended with a two hour written exam

Students were Natasha Greenland, Julian Cooke and Angela Maher.

During that fifth week the students were tasked to deal with a number of scenarios, including a suspected burglary at the Pink Shop and drinking before permitted hours at Deano's Bar. Sergeant Whistler said, "These assessments are made as lifelike as possible due to the help of the establishment's owners. They also had to deal with a Road Traffic Accident and qualified in first aid, lifesaving and sat through a mock trial in front of the Senior Magistrate, whilst they were quizzed by both Prosecution and Defence lawyers.

"After a very intense and thought provoking course, I am glad to say that all three passed and I wish them well in their new careers. Q FIG made a substantial surplus last year. Why then has it increased personal and corporate tax?

A Chairman of Standing Finance Committee, Councillor Andrea Clausen replied:

The surplus for 2006/07 was only realised last month when a preliminary assessment of the year end was made and presented to Standing Finance Committee.

The decision to increase personal and corporate tax was made at the last Budget Select Committee which took place in May 2007, and was made in order to attempt to mitigate pressures on the budget in future years.

Revenues to Government from the increased tax rates will not be realised until 2008/09. To conclude Budget Select Committee were not aware that there would

be such a surplus at the 2006/07 year end at the time they took the decision to review tax rates and thresholds.

Q Who is responsible for Lookout Industrial Estate?

Veteran launches petition for cheap flights

A FALKLANDS veteran who visited the Islands as part of the pilgrimage last month has launched a petition for cheap flights for veterans

Terry Sears, who served with 2Para in 1982 is petitioning the Prime Minister to allow veterans to visit the Islands using the Ministry of Defence (MoD) low cost 'indulgence' flights system. He told *MercoPress*: When we

He told *MercoPress*: When we went back to the Islands as part of an organised pilgrimage we were amazed to find out that veterans and families have to pay full cost whilst serving MoD employees can use the MoD indulgence flight system only costing £50.

"There have been more Falklands war veteran suicides since the 1982 Conflict and as we found out, the visit can be vital in terms of finding some peace. Unfortunately many former soldiers cannot afford the flight to the Falklands."

The petition is also supported by Derek Twigg MP, Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Defence and Minister for Veterans who joined the pilgrimage in the Islands. The link to the petition is www.petitions.pm.gov.uk/ Veterans-flights.

Fines for driving offences

A NOT guilty verdict was recorded in court on Friday after the prosecution decided to offer no evidence with regard to a taking a vehicle without consent charge.

Teodoro Conejeros Anobile initially admitted three offences; driving without a licence and insurance and taking a vehicle without consent.

The charges related to an incident on November 5, when Mr Conejeros Anobile was stopped by the police in the early hours of the morning.

An alcohol breathalyser test revealed that Mr Conejeros Anobile was not over the legal limit but further investigations showed that his provisional driving licence had expired a short time before.

Defence lawyer David Lang said Mr Conejeros Anobile had been told by a director of his employer that he was allowed to use the vehicle for work purposes but that he was not aware it was only for work purposes. This was backed up by the defendant who told the court that he did not believe it to be a mistake to take the vehicle for personal use.

vehicle for personal use. Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson sitting with Assessors Judy Summers and Terry Spruce said there was possible ambivalence about the instructions given to the defendant.

The charge was again read to Mr Conejeros Anobile who entered a plea of not guilty to the charge and Crown Counsel Julia Kraehling-Smith said she did not intend to offer any evidence.

Mr Conejeros Anobile was fined £100 for driving without a licence and £100 for the lack of insurance plus £70 prosecution costs.

Reserve Police Officer sentenced

FORMER reserve Police Officer. Luke Griffin (21) was given a suspended prison sentence after he pleaded guilty to possessing cannabis.

Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson told Mr Griffin that the Falklands does not have a serious drug problem and she was satisfied that a custodial sentence was necessary to be seen as a deterrent to both him and others. That he had been a reserve police officer was an "aggravating feature" having brought the RFIP into disrepute, she added.

His sentence is to be suspended, however, as following a discussion with the Mental Health Nurse Miss Thompson, said it was apparent his mental health was "fragile" and she was concerned he could not safely serve the time in prison.

in prison. "It is not to be seen as a light option," she said. "You would go to prison if not for your mental health situation."

Cannabis supplier jailed for six weeks

STANLEY man Alastair Ceballos was sentenced to six weeks in prison after he admitted supplying cannabis to Mr Griffin.

Following a search of his residence two small silver boxes were discovered containing 0.3 grams of a cannabis like substance. Julia Kraehling-Smith told the court.

When interviewed he immediately admitted selling £20 worth to Mr Griffin, she said, adding that it was a "friendship service" as opposed to a commercial one.

Mr Ceballos told the police that he would not and could not give up the identity of his supplier, she said.

Defence lawyer Richard Marlor said it was the first time Mr Ceballos had given or sold drugs to anyone, that it was a very small amount and he had not set out to supply all and sundry.

He said it was a one-off and he bitterly regretted the position he had put himself, his daughter and partner in.

Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson said that while she had taken into account the considerable mitigation for the defendant she was satisfied that a custodial sentence was the only suitable method to deal with the case.

Mrs Kirchner takes up presidential seat

CRISTINA Kirchner, Argentina's first elected woman President was sworn in on Tuesday, receiving the sash of office from her husband, the outgoing head of state.

The Times reports that chants of 'Viva Cristina' erupted as Mrs Kirchner (54) a social democrat, swapped her position as first lady for that of President.

In her inaugural speech she said that there would be no definite triumph as long as there is poverty and insisted that Argentina's sovereignty over the Falklands was "non negotiable."

With the notable exception of

LAST month the Attorney General advised the Governor that my seat on Council had become vacant. FIG had required me to act up as CMO when the CMO was on leave. They told me I could do this as a Councillor. That was incorrect.

This fiasco occurred through no wrong-doing on my part. If I am reelected I will not act as CMO again; the work of the medical department can and will be divided more appropriately.

In 2005 I promised to fight for self-determination, for open government, and for fair treatment of government and private sector employees. I remain committed to these goals.

Unless we secure our right to govern ourselves and remain British for our children and grandchildren, everything else we do is a waste of time. We cannot afford to be complacent. In the last two years I have used every opportunity to raise the subject and promote our rights to self-determination, particularly in UK and South America. I proposed a motion last month calling for just this, but I lost my seat, and the debate did not happen.

I strongly believe in the fair treatment of all employees both in government and the private sector. Job security, equal pay for equal work, and clear effective policy to get Falkland Islanders into jobs. In my first year on Council 1 helped

IT WAS not an overnight decision in choosing to stand, more a taking up of responsibilities to one's home.

It's difficult to convey one's care for the community in five hundred words. The most pressing issue is how alienated many in the community feel and powerless, in feeling that nothing can be done to stop more petty laws, the erosion of caring for everyone as opposed to catering for the elite - which has become so prevalent. Yet when faced with a choice come election time one is left with several who see being a Coun-cillor as a chance to further their social calendar and private business. This is not though a random attack on the establishment, or private enterprise, as much at the same time has been achieved, which we have all benefited from. Former Councillor Cheek and current Councillor Mike Summers are priceless, and I have no illusions as to whose place I am looking to fill.



achieve consultation with the Union and a proper cost of living award for civil servants. More recently, on my instigation, the Chief Executive has been tasked to look at a range of problems in government, including working conditions and retention.

To achieve a good quality of life for all, we need to ensure a healthy economy and vigorous private sector. Amongst other things, the Falkland Islands need a deep water port. We will have to find a way to fund this. As an ex-seaman, I fail to see how this can be achieved on the FIPASS site.

l AM standing in this unexpected by-election for the same reasons that I stood for election in the past. It's all about service to the Islands that I came to 34 years ago. Whoever is elected will have to

Whoever is elected will have to accept that they are joining a Council where the major policy decisions have already been made for this term. Nevertheless, I believe that this is an election about local issues and I feel unhappy with the way in which some decisions have been made, with seemingly little regard for what has gone before. A prime example was the attempted withdrawal of the pre-paid electricity cards. Did no-one ask the simple question "Why were they introduced?"

The main issues that I am interested in and which I believe make me suitable to represent you, the Stanley electorate, include:-

Housing – as one of the prime movers in the decision to build East Stanley I remain very interested in housing and would lobby for the provision of new serviced building plots. The present policy of infilling the centre of town seems short-sighted.

Medical – this department continues to give an excellent service. I am unsure about the introduction of an exercise referral officer. I understand that the treatment will not be free and think that, on balance, money would be better spent on a dental hygienist. This is a service that almost everyone will benefit from.

Education has its share of problems. I remain unconvinced that the solution is (simply) to put more non-teaching middle management in place. Is the Primary School approaching full capacity or not? There need to be some serious decisions about the future long term needs, not just for the department itself, but again because the impact affects us all.

I believe that the time has come to move to a purpose built hostel for camp students boarding in Stanley. My view of the Stanley



House site is as before – it should be a centre for senior citizens. There is ample room for more sheltered housing. The Yates Close build, which I was involved with, I still consider that to be phase one.

Immigration matters are causing great concerns, which I share. Two years on – where is the new policy?

Job creation is another growing issue that needs to be taken seriously. We need investment in projects that show a chance of financial return and create employment opportunities. Tourism should be at the forefront. The independent overview of the economy just published suggests that there are some concerns that need to be addressed. It should be given serious consideration by this Council.

Whilst serving on previous councils I was proud of my record of following through with constituents' concerns and problems. I may not always have delivered good news, but I always responded.

My interests are broad but summarised as believing in openness, fairness and service to the community. If you, the electorate, decide to vote me in to represent you, this is what you will get.

Argentian needs to be ignored more, and our own people thought about more.

I have gone through a huge change myself in recent years, and with the passing of my father and being with him and the show of respect he received feel humbled to take on his work ethics, and his care for the community, and to ask the difficult questions when they scream out to be asked - and to listen to people rather than simply telling everyone what is good for them.

of millions in other projects. The Cross Sound Ferry has been accepted as the way forward to aid Camp development. The outrun of this project will cost in the order of £2M annually for the next eight years. Supporters of the project are embarrassed at the escalating costs. Camp tracks in support of the ferry are being neglected. If serious capping and maintenance are not completed even more stretches will become impassable in wet periods.

Changes to EU regulation causes rising costs at the Abattoir, but many farmers, encouraged by the Ag Dept., have diversified into meat which has added a farm saving second source of income. With now only 496,000 sheep a close watch must be kept on the cost benefit equation.

This Council was weak regarding the flag waving Argentine visitor, a firm policy must be in place before future visits. I support our continued presence at the UN Committee of 24 and other high profile meetings where our right of self determination can be stated.

The new portfolio structure fails to improve scrutiny but further widens the gap between Councillors on ExCo and the others. I support all eight members on ExCo.

All is not doom and gloom, our youngsters continue to seek higher education and apprenticeships and we must recognise this with preference in jobs on their return.

The Wind Fam, supported and sponsored by the last Council, has been a great success. Cable and Wireless is slowly be-

Cable and Wireless is slowly being sorted out but there is still a long way to go to improve reliability, efficiency and lower tariffs.

Hospital facilities need upgrading with scanning facilities. Pensions need to be brought in

house and improved

Immigration policy review needs completing. I could go on but space is lim-

ited. I cannot promise anything other than to do my best.

AS reported last week, local fishing company South Atlantic Marine Services (SAMS) has failed in its application for a judicial review into two decisions made by His Excellency the Governor. This was the first case of its kind since the introduction of the government's new fishery policy.

In 2000 government decided it wanted to introduce a new system of allocating fishing rights and appointed a Fisheries Committee to consider this. The Fisheries Conservation and Management Ordinance 2005 was published in September 2005, setting out the mechanics for the grant of quota, but not the policy of distribution, which is a matter of policy for government.

In the event it was decided to base the quota allocation on a fishing company's track record during a specified three year period.

SAMS contended that its catch during most of the three year period upon which the fishing quota was calculated was depressed by having lost trawler *Playa da Coba* through fire in March 1999, which it was unable to replace with another (the *Costa do Cabo*) until the end of 2002.

SAMS wanted an adjustment to their track record based on what they would have been able to achieve had a trawler been available.

When this was put to the Governor, he, after consultation with ExCo in December 2006 and February 2007, decided the quota allocation policy, decided by ExCo in October 2006, should be applied in SAMS's case without adjustment - to reflect the fact that probably most operators would experience problems at some stage in their fishing operation.

The three day hearing for the application for a judicial review on the Governor's decisions took place in the Supreme Court before Chief Justice Christopher Gardner QC from November 13 to 16.

SAMS argued that to make no adjustment to its fishing quota to reflect the lost vessel, particularly as the quota to last for almost a quarter of a century, was so unreasonable, unfair and irrational that no reasonable decision maker could have so decided.

The court, however, disagreed and felt that while such a decision might be unfortunate for the individuals concerned it was a reasonable and rational one to come to.

The hearing involved consideration of numerous communications that took place over some seven years and involved propositions of administrative law, and the authorities upon which they were based.

Justice Gardner in delivering his judgment said it would be of little comfort to SAMS for him to state that he had considerable sympathy for its situation, adding. "...but I do so nonetheless.

The fishing company's legal representative Richard Marlor, said that SAMS was very disappointed with the decision.

"The Governor and councillors in deciding not to allow any adjustment to the ITQ (Individual Transferable Quota) awarded to SAMS, also expressed their sympathy with SAMS's situation. However, this is of little consolation to SAMS."

The issue of court costs will be determined in due course if it can not be agreed between the parties.



Christine commented: "We would like to thank Alan Eagle for



Planning and building news

By Graham France MEMBERS and officers attending this month's meeting of the Planning and Building Committee stood for a minute's silence in memory of past-member Graham Middleton who died the day following the last meeting he attended on November 2.

The Hon Richard Stevens chaired the meeting and welcomed myself as new Lay Member replacing Gerald Cheek following completion of the latter's three years in office. Apologies for absence were recorded for Andrea Wright, the Environmental Planning Officer (EPO), and in her place applications were presented by Ken Snape, the Building Adviser

Following the usual preliminaries, members reviewed first the proposal for the erection of a two-storey dwelling at 2 Goss Road for Ryan Hawksworth, which was deferred at the last meeting over concerns on its potential impact in the area. Discussions had taken place on the possibility of a one-and-ahalf-storey design, but it was now agreed that, subject to a condition biniting the height of the roof ridge to no more than 33 metres above mean low water spring tide level, the original proposal could be approved.

New applications

Two new applications which involved seeking the views of members of the Historic Buildings Committee were first considered – Jane Cameron, Government Archivist, and Terence Jaffray of that body attended. First to be looked at was for an extension to the West Store which included a new entrance and car park improvements submitted by the Faikland Islands Company. Following discussion on finishing materials and possible amendments to the south entrance it was agreed to grant conditional planning permission for the development.

The committee then looked at Government's proposals for internal modifications with removal of existing south extensions and replacement with single-storey extensions, similar to those recently built at the adjoining cottages, to 3, 4, 5 and 6 Police Cottages on Ross Road. This, too, received conditional planning permission. Moving on to other proposals

Moving on to other proposals for new development submitted since the last meeting, members considered the following and granted conditional planning permission: at 2 Allardyce Street for Jeannie McKay, the construction of an extension to the living room and other minor works; an extension with internal alterations to the dwelling at 7 Fitzroy Road East for Paul Freer; demoliton of the existing garage and replacement with new at 3 Ross Road East for Mike Harris: and the sub-division of upper floor levels to create an additional flat with the provision of two parking spaces at 34 – 36 Ross Road for The Gift Shop Limited (Lay Member Anna King left the meeting during discussion on this proposal).

One application was refused consent – the outline application submitted by Geoff and Wanda Greenough for the erection of a bungalow with off-street parking on land east of 9 Snake Hill Prior to the discussion on this submission, members were handed a copy of a letter addressed to the EPO and signed by seven members of the public in which they objected to the proposed development.

It was reported that the attention of the applicants had been drawn to the presence of a water main running through the site, which meant there was need to retain some of the land free of any development to allow for future servicing. It was felt that there would then be insufficient space for the dwelling outside of that area and it was accordingly agreed to refuse planning permission.

Two applications were deferred at the meeting to allow discussion between officers and the applicants. In the matter of the proposal to site three Portakabins and tarmac 1,500 square metres of ground for use as a go-karting recreational area near to Stanley Airport (west of the Fire & Rescue Section Warehouse), submitted by Russell Morrison and James Bates, further information is to be sought including the potential level of noise and the provision of toilet accommodation Members commented they did not wish to appear negative to such forms of entrepreneurial investment, but did feel it necessary to seek more details before reaching a decision.

As to the Department of Agriculture's proposal to locate a container for use by the Veterinary Section for monitoring of animal disease, members were reminded of earlier decisions to refuse permission for the location of dog kennels not far from the proposed siting. It was understood that the proposed structure would be used only occasionally as kennels for quarantine to monitor illness but the committee felt more information was needed, including the possible provision of cage(s) to be attached.

Ken Snape then answered a small number of questions on the twenty-five applications listed seeking building permits, the majority of which he had been able to issue. The next meeting will be on Thursday, January 10.



Albatross conservation and research go hand-in-hand

Continuing our ACAP series, this week scientists are under the spotlight

IN THIS series we already have met albatross ambassadors on land and at sea. But you might wonder how the conservation measures used by these people were devised and how we know they are effective.

Answering this question reveals a third group of ambassadors: the scientists, and don't think white coated ones, but field researchers working on the remote and rugged Falklands coastlines where albatrosses and petrels breed.

"Albatross conservation and research go hand-in-hand." explained Orea Anderson of Queens University. Belfast, who spent last summer working on Dr Paulo Catry's black-browed albatross study population on New Island.

"Without studies into exactly how albatrosses are exposed to particular threats, little can be done to protect them effectively. But once the threats have been identified, conservation measures can be put in place to shield albatrosses from these threats, whilst at the same time allowing the continuance of other uses of the ocean."

The Falklands-wide census in 2000 and 2005 of black-browed albatrosses conducted by Falklands Conservation (FC) highlighted the decline in populations. Director of Falklands Conservation Grant Munro explained that from this knowledge, FC instigated an applied research programme to reduce incidental mortality associated with fishing vessels.

"This involved exhaustively testing, by replicated experiments, the efficiency of different mitigation methods," explained Grant. "Without robust testing of multiple designs from prototype to final design, the successes by our fishing fleets could not have been achieved. This is practical conservation-focused research."

Falklands Conservation has also conducted satellite tracking and colour marking of adult albatross and fledglings to map their distribution and determine what risks they may

be exposed to away from the colonies, both in summer when breeding and during their winter dispersal. "Last year. Nic Huin and Isaac Forster attached satellite tags onto eight breeding study albatrosses to determine where they were foraging and onto three juveniles as they left on their first flight," said Grant. These tags recorded the bird's position by satellite every few hours for up to four months.

Nic conducted similar satellite tracking of birds breeding at Saunders Island and Beauchene Island in 1999 and 2000. Combined with the colour marking of 16.537 fledging albatross on Steeple Jason in 2002 and then having observers on a variety of vessels across the Patagonian Shelf. South Atlantic Ocean and Southern Ocean recording their dispersal. Falklands Conservation has built up a picture of the seasonal distribution of adult and juvenile albatrosses.

"During the early breeding season, breeding black-browed albatrosses from the Falkland Islands will travel as far as Peninsula Valdes, but once the chick has hatched, trips are shorter and birds remain wholly within Falklands waters," explained Grant.

"The winter dispersal is most interesting, with males staying closest to the Falklands, females travelling to the north of the Patagonian shelf and juveniles on their first flight going as far as Brazil within three days of leaving the nest."

The knowledge that Falklands black-browed albatrosses travel far across the southwest Atlantic Ocean means that if our monitoring programmes continue to report a decline, then part of problem, and the solution, involves conservation actions being undertaken in these waters as well. But already, Falklands Conservation is working with Brazilian organisations directly and through BirdLife International to tackle seabird mortality by fishing vessels.

The two albatross monitoring programmes in the Falkland Islands are conducted by New Island Conservation Trust and Falklands Conservation, and both feed data in a continual assessment of the effectiveness of conservation measures. Counting breeding pairs in colonies and monitoring breeding success in study colonies is the ultimate indicator as to whether the mitigation measures used by fishermen and land managers are working. On New Island and at a few other colonies monitored by Ian Strange by aerial photography, the number of blackbrowed albatrosses has increased in recent years (see articles in PN September 28 and November 23).

Dr Paulo Catry's albatross monitoring programme on New Island is in its fifth year. "By ringing birds in a study colony of approximately 500 breeding pairs and then monitoring each summer over a period of 10 to 20 years what birds return and which pairs fledge a chick, we will begin to understand more precisely where the vulnerability lies. for example whether it is during the summer or winter, for fledglings, immatures or adult birds or for males or females," explained Dr Catry, who works at the behavioural ecology unit of the Instituto Superior de Psicologia Aplicada in Portugal.

Under Dr Catry's supervision. PhD student Orea Anderson looks more closely at the diet of the albatross. Orea is looking at whether what a black-browed albatross eats determines its ability to produce a healthy chick, and if an albatross does the same thing every year or changes its foraging pattern to suit the conditions. "I hope to identify whether there are particular foraging strategies that may lead individuals within a population into greater conflict with fishing activitics," she said.

She is also measuring how much pollutants the albatrosses from South Georgia have accumulated. "Albatrosses are an indicator of the health of the overall system and because they often eat the same fish species we like, our research will also show what levels of pollutants we also face."

Dr Catry's albatross monitoring programme also includes looking at whether the low-impact cruise ship passenger measures in force on New Island do in fact mean no impact on the breeding seabirds. According to a study by Dr Catry and fellow scientists Rafael Matias and Riek van Noordwijk, described in the recent publication New Island, Falklands Islands: A South Atlantic Wildlife Sanctuary for conservation management, there was no evidence for reduced breeding success in the more intensively visited areas of the tourist site.


Last summer, Falklands Conservation also started a long-term population monitoring study at Steeple Jason, the largest blackbrowed albatross colony in the world and owned by the Wildlife Conservation Society of New York. "In the first year, 300 breeding pairs and their chicks were ringed and this year the study site has been expanded to over 400 marked nests," explained Grant.

All albatross and petrel research programmes in the Falkland Islands have been licensed by the Environmental Planning Department because Falklands law prohibits anyone from handling, capturing or harming birds (except upland geese and feral geese, and ducks that can be shot in season). However, the law does allow people to help injured birds, and Falklands Conservation and the vets at the Department of Agriculture can provide advice if anyone finds a wild animal in need of assistance.

Environment Officer Helen Otley explained that the evaluation process for issuing a research licence involved ensuring that scientists used methods which were appropriate and had low impact on the target species, and other species present in breeding areas (e.g. rockhopper penguins and king shags). "Where impacts are expected, these effects are judged against the value of the new knowledge to improving the conservation management of the species." Helen explained.

"Research proposals are discussed and debated by the Environmental Committee, which is comprised of representatives from various organisations and commercial organisations in the Falklands and two community members." Recently, ACAP stakeholders

met and identified how the Falkland Islands is meeting its obligations to protect and manage albatrosses and petrels. "The Falklands are undertaking most of the high priority tasks and the results are pleasing," says Helen. "But we identified that one of the priority areas for the future is securing better support for the monitoring programmes. At the moment, both the programmes conducted by New Island Conservation Trust and Falklands Conservation are supported by a variety of local and international sources, which are for the most part short-term." If albatrosses live for more than 20 years, then our commitment in the Falklands needs to be likewise.

disputed the Argentine views. He introduced himself as a veteran with a long association with the Islands and opened his speech by saying that none of the panellists had made mention of the Islanders, doing so only in passing as if they never existed.

A BRITISH veteran of the Falklands war who stood up for

Islanders at a seminar organised by

the Argentine Embassy at the London School of Economics (LSE) last week has been branded

"the angry British veteran" by a number of Argentine reporters. The seminar, entitled "Argentine Rights and Sovereignty" in-

cluded addresses from two Argen-

tine academics and a German inter-

national lawyer. Dr Rudolf Dolzer, who has written a book about the

Falklands dispute, who believes the

as if they never existed. He told Penguin News: "I forwarded that this dispute is all about people and the inherent right under the UN Charter for the Islanders to live in peace and to be selfdetermining. I spoke at length informing the panel and the audience that the island community was selfgoverning, with their own constitution and were living in freely in democracy. I mentioned that the Islanders had worked hard to become successful and that they had never been a threat to Argentina and only wished to live in peace free from threat."

He then posed questions directly to the Ambassador: "I mentioned to him that I was pleased that he recognised the victims in Argentina's Dirty War. I then said, quite passionately, that if Argentina can recognise the victim's of the fascist Junta between 1976 and 1982, then why couldn't they see the Islanders as victims of that past too? I mentioned the effects of the invasion on the island community, where one morning they woke to find that their lives had suddenly and traumatically changed.

"I asked the Ambassador why Argentina has yet to say sorry directly to the islanders themselves for the events of 1982? I asked why, after 25 years, no one had apologised for the hurt and trauma caused? Instead President Kirchner's administration had labelled the Islands community, as simply implanted colonists. I made mention of the many generations of Fakland islanders and the immigrant past of Argentina, as such the Islanders were anything but, implanted colonists."

The response, he said, was disappointing - the words of Anthony Eastwood, a member of the South Atlantic Council were particularly upsetting. Speaking of his dealings with the Falklands over fishing, he described Islanders as "...sometimes difficult to talk to, because they aren't the sort of people who have the developed intellects that people in this room would feel totally happy with."

He said that for conflict resolution there would have to be "constructiveness" and "political reality" and commented: "One of the problems that we face with the Falklands population is that political realism is thin on the ground, economic realism is thin on the ground, and security realism is thin on the ground. We need to, if we could, help them to become more realistic about their position, because at the end of the day we have to have a constructive solution.

"If they insist on being emotional in their attitude to the problem we all face, what will happen I think is that their emotions will be traded by the media in this country and will resonate with the British public and no British government will feel able to go against the emotions of the British public here.

"I think that that is one of the problems that we face and I think what it has led to, as the Ambassador knows very well, is a stalemate situation. Therefore we have to find a way out of this stalemate. I don't know how we do it; education comes to mind."

All in all, John McDermott described the seminar as "a very cordial event" mostly attended by the Argentine community based in London.

He commented. "I believe that I am right is stating that the colloquium was not entirely a balanced discussion event, as it could have been. It appeared to be clear that the panellists and the audience had the singular view that the Argentine sovereignty case was the righteous one. Therefore, what was discussed was simply preaching to the already converted."

However, he feels that more of these events should take place, whether in London or in Buenos Aires, being mindful to purposely invite both sides of the divide "Otherwise, unfortunately, these colloquium events might simply be seen purely one-sided propaganda exercises. Perhaps, Falkland House in London could now take up the banner. I feel they should."



Wool market report for week ending December 7, By Peter Johnson, Department of Agriculture

A RISING market this week for wools less than 26 micron, with significant gains in the lower micron ranges.

The AWEX "Eastern Market Indicator" (EMI) hit a six month high, finishing at 428.3 pence per kilogram clean, up compared with last week's 421.8p/kg.

There was a clearance rate of 89% in Australia, 90% in New Zealand, while in South Africa 92% of bales changed hands.

Analysts are predicting a boost in sales next week, the last before the Christmas recess. This boost is related to tight supply, and expectations that buying activity form China will increase in the New Year, when import quota restrictions are reset.

64,000 bales will be on offer in Australia next week.

ing Solutions... the other prize of a bottle of port was claimed by the



New approach to financial planning

THE government is to develop a five year plan for its approach to budgeting.

As a result of the production of the new Islands Plan (see page 2) which sets out medium to long term objectives, a five year Medium Term Financial Plan (MTFP) will be developed for modest reduction and redirection of the government's expenditure, through the creation of an Island Plan Reserve, and for a shadow MTFP to meet reductions in revenue from the illex fishery.

Financial Secretary Derek Howatt said the key differences in the MTFP were that it looked ahead five years instead of the current three and planned targets for those five years instead of the current one.

He commented: "The advantage of a more structured and longer plan is that FIG should be better equipped to achieve its objectives and aspirations under the Islands Plan and to cope with any unexpected changes over the medium term.

"The MTFP should ensure that public services and programmes remain sustainable and affordable in the medium term. Subject to annual review it will form the basis of the budget process including the funding mechanism for the Islands Plan."

Mr Howati said the MTFP sought to develop both a balanced budget and "facilitate resource redirection for growth" by a combination of reductions in expenditure and additional income of £1m per annum. The shadow plan will look at a scenario of double this figure in case of a further reduction in illex income.

He commented: "I anticipate that the MTFP (and its shadow) will be highly significant aids, along with FIG's other plans, in the development of future budget strategy and fiscal policy."

Shearer is fastest driver caught by police

A SHEARER who was clocked travelling at 93 miles per hour on the Stanley to Darwin Road, narrowly evaded a prison sentence when he appeared in court on Wednesday. Evan Jones (23) was ordered to pay a total of £1,570 in fines and was disqualified from driving for 18 months after he pleaded guilty to speeding and reckless driving.

Retrospective increase for holiday credits

THE budget surplus from the last with financial year has prompted production by the councillors to reconsider Holiday the Credit Scheme (HCS) payments.

Following a surplus of £5.5 million, a one-off retrospective payment is to be made increasing the daily allowance to 50p for adults and 25p for children for 2006/07. This will cost the Falklands Government £168,000.

There was discussion among councillors at Standing Finance Committee on Monday as to the benefits of the scheme and a vote was taken on whether the bonus payment would be made. A four two majority agreed to the payment.

At the meeting, Councillors Clausen and Summers appeared not to vote in favour while Cllr Hansen was not present.

Cllr Summers later said however, that he did not vote against the principle of the payment, adding that when the Chair had called for a show of hands, "...l did not respond because I was not ready to do so." Crown Counsel Julia Kraehling-Smith said that while the police were carrying out static speed checks on December 11, Mr Jones was detected travelling at 93mph on a tarmac section of the road about half a mile from the Mt Kent turn-off. She said the police were not aware of anyone having travelled faster on that road.

After deliberating with JP assessors Terry Spruce and Phyl Rendell for almost an hour, Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson said they had seriously considered a custodial sentence because of the danger Mr Jones had put other road users in.

However, she added, Mr Jones did not injure anyone else or damage property - but it was a serious offence and a deterrent message had to be publicly issued.

A FINAL draft of the Islands Plan 2008-12 has been released for public consultation.


The Plan sets out the agenda of government and promises to the community and stakeholders.

Fines and bans for driving offences | FCO advisers satisfied with

STANLEY man Robert Duncan (19) pleaded guilty to five driving offences on Wednesday.

Crown Counsel Julia Kraehling-Smith said that the charges of driving without due care, without a licence, insurance or seatbelt, and taking a vehicle without consent related to an incident when a vehicle was rolled over the sea wall onto the beach on Ross Road East in the early hours of November 10.

She said the keys of the vehicle had been given by the owner to Scott Henry Roberts who then became drunk and passed them on to Mr Duncan who only held a provisional licence. Mr Duncan was sober and thought he was able to drive with any full licence holder with him, however Mr Scott had not held his licence for the requisite two years. Ms Kraehling-Smith said while

driving down Ross Road East near the S-bend with the junction with Hebe Street he lost control of the vehicle, demolishing a fence after mounting the kerb. She said Mr Duncan had tried to brake and hit the accelerator instead and when he tried to reverse the car fell over the sea wall onto the beach

Senior Magistrate Alison Thompson said it was an "utterly foolish" thing to have done, but added that to some extent he had acted in good faith in not wanting Mr Roberts to drive when drunk

Taking into account that the vehicle and fence were being paid for by both men, Mr Duncan was fined a total of £850 plus £70 costs and disqualified from driving for one year.

Mr Roberts admitted permitting Mr Duncan to drive the vehicle and was fined £150 plus £50 costs.

Miss Thompson told Mr Roberts that his was a worse offence than driving without a licence, adding that he had put his friend in this situation by being drunk and handing over the keys of the vehicle.

Constitution consultation

FOREIGN and Commonwealth legal advisers visiting the Falklands last week have declared themselves more than satisfied with the consultative process, undertaken by the Select Committee on the Constitution.

Team Leader lan Hendry told Penguin News: "It has been a long process ... I came here in 2000 and 1 remember at that time we were discussing a handful of issues, since when the Select Committee has done a huge amount of work and evidently engaged in consultation and held many public meetings.

"So it has not been a rushed and superficial process - quite the opposite, it is very thorough.

"We are in no doubt that each and every recommendation has been well chewed over and thought out so there is no question that the FCO has any concerns about the consultation process."

Mr Hendry was accompanied by Deputy Head of the Overseas Territories Department (FCO) Andrew Allen and ex-FCO legal adviser Michael Bradley. The team undertook close to 14 hours of discussions

Both Mr Hendry and Councillor Mike Summers, who has been lead-ing the Select Committee on the Constitution, agreed the talks had been held, "...in a cooperative spirit.

Mr Hendry said, "We were in problem solving mode rather than problem finding mode and we achieved the aim which I had set, of working our way at least on a first reading basis all the way through the final report. We managed to have some discussion of every recommendation that was made in the report and we, provisionally at least, resolved a number of points.

"Naturally there are some that are left outstanding and that we will need to come back to at the next round of discussion. One of those is the definition of those who 'for purposes of the constitution' are deemed to belong to the Falkland Islands. We had a good discussion of that and there are some parts that 1 don't think are problematic and other parts where we have had to reserve our position and think about it a bit more."

Comparing the process with other Overseas Territories he explained: "One difference compared to many other Overseas Territories is that the local review body has been a Select Committee of the Legislative Council, and that is similar to Gibraltar, whereas other Territories have set up constitutional review councils or committees mostly of local wise men and women to go out and test public opinion and do what the Select Committee did here.

Mr Hendry is now tasked with producing a draft constitution for consideration by the Select Committee and further discussions are likely to be scheduled for February.

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East-west flight discussions not imminent

GIVING evidence in London to the Foreign Affairs Select Committee, Councillor Mike Summers praised the Foreign and Commonwealth Office for their unwavering support on the sovereignty issue, however he caused concern when he intimated that discussions with Argentina over flights would be possible once an improved north-south route was in place.

In reply to a question from Sir John Stanley as to the Island's cur-rent position on civil direct flights between the Falklands and Argentina. Cllr Summers said the government are not content at the moment for there to be direct flights to Argentina. He said there is a strategy to improve the north-south airbridge to service needs, and then go back to discussing east-west flights. "We must have confidence that

the north-south flight is available to us and capable of expansion before we go back to east-west discussions about how to go through Argentina.

He added that if there is confi-dence in the airbridge, "...we will be more open to considering flights that stopped in Argentina.

Cllr Summers told Penguin News that what prevents lack of discussion with Argentina is that the Falklands wil not agree to discuss scheduled flights originating from and stopping in Argentina - ie a Falklands-Argentina scheduled flight.

The reason for this is that we do not wish to put ourselves at the mercy of a hostile Argentine government, or give them the opportunity to interfere with our external access, either through manipulation of pricing, scheduling or immigration issues.

'That is why any discussions about any east-west flights, be they charters, second Lan Chile flights from Santiago, or second Lan Chile flights transiting Argentina, are not on the table."

He added, "Our ability to develop therefore relies on the development of north-south options, and greater flexibility on the airbridge coupled with improvements for passengers is a key step in developing that route," he said

Falklands councillors and the public will have the opportunity to submit further information to the Select Committee when its members travel to the Falklands in February, 2008

Closer relationship for EU and OCTs

IN A move to lessen the theoretical and practical gaps between the European Union and Overseas Countries and Territories (OCT) a paper on the relationship post 2013, is to be prepared.

Councillors Clausen and Summers, along with EU Policy Officer Jenny Smith, recently attended a meeting of the two groups. Cllr Clausen said the reasons for the review are largely based on the gaps in the relationships. The Overseas Association De-

cision carves out a clear relationship by which the OCTs should derive certain privileges, however these are

being eroded as a result of globalisation and in particular the establishment of trade agreements between the EU and most of the rest of the world," she said.

The Commission for the European Union (EU) wants to bring OCTs closer into the EU, at the same time recognising that OCTs have an important role to play by virtue of their geographical locations and being part of the EU family promulgate the EU into their regions, she added.

The paper is to be produced in early 2008 and consulted on towards the end of the year.

'Councillors create their own social class'



Criticism and praise for economic management

THE four candidates standing in the January 3 by-election have been revealing their views on a number of issues during the past week. On Monday they participated in

On Monday they participated in a press conference broadcast live on FIRS and on Tuesday evening they took questions from members of the Chamber of Commerce. On Wednesday night they were back in the FIRS studio for a live phone-in discussion.

Discussion of how the government is managing the economy dominated Monday's press conference.

Dr Richard Davies, whose vacation of his seat after he was found to have breached the Constitution led to the by-election, said he had been impressed during the first two years of this council by how carefully financial decisions are scrutinised. He commented: "They are certainly discussed at length, advice is listened to and often taken. [But] That doesn't mean that the right balance is always achieved."

He said a balance had to be struck between quality of life issues and economic factors: "We have to balance projects where you spend to save money, against projects where you are going to get a quick return. The most contentious one is the

The most contentious one is the abattoir at the minute. The underlying justification of the abattoir is that we want to maintain a vibrant community in the Camp - now, whether the abattoir is the best way to do that or not I don't know but the fact is a huge amount of resource has already been put into it. Do we pull the plug on it or do we look for middle ground?"

look for middle ground?" He added: "The port is another potentially expensive project but one which I think we are going to have to grasp. We do have to spend large sums of money sometimes."

Roger Edwards said the government had been wasteful and a tighter control wass needed: "Last year as they suddenly discovered - and 1 know at the end of the last budgetary year there were all sorts of problems with getting reports out to SFC and the like - but to have £5.6 million they didn't know about, something is wrong there. There hasn't been a tight enough control over that budgetary figure."

More focus needs to be made on employing Islanders, Mr Edwards said: "We should be looking after our youngsters who return well educated - the goal posts for them are changing the whole time. We are formulating jobs that only those from overseas can take and I think that is wrong, it is criminal. We have people here who can do it. "At the end of the last council

"At the end of the last council there were a couple of fairly major posts coming up and with much fighting I managed to persuade them to employ local people, not to reemploy contract officers or look for further contract officers... And they ve turned out to be admirable. We do have the ability and I think it's time that we stood up a bit more and said 'Falklands first'."

John Birmingham, who previously served as a councillor for eleven years criticised the tax increase made by the government in the last budget round. He commented: "One of the basics of any country has to be trying to attract investment - with investment from overseas you can then get down to what we all need to think about, which is creating jobs.

"Giving the wrong signals such as we heard last May, that is not the way forward. The Falkland islands has got to realise we are now getting a wave of very well educated people coming back, we have to do something about creating opportunities for them..."

Mr Birmingham said the present council seemed to be "hell bent" on major capital projects that would not result in jobs. "A particular stone in my shoe is the investment in the wool company which for the life of me I could never understand why government decided to get so financtally involved in an area of the economy they hadn't been involved in for over 160 years.

"We have to create more jobs, more employment opportunities for Falkland Islanders..."

First time candidate James Peck said a "cultural problem" existed in the management of the economy, particularly in relation to spending on Camp: "There is quite a strong feeling...against continual money being given to certain areas which really don't hold up. We can't get the Camp working profitably because people can't speak the truth any more - we have been putting money into the Camp for many years but actually are people in the Camp taking the help seriously? I think there is something fundamentally wrong with that and this culture of dependency." He continued: "I think the gov-

He continued: "I think the government is left to try and sort it out and to be honest I think it's a hard job. I think many areas need to look at themselves, it's not just the government's handling of the economy really, I think one must have a look at themselves as well."

IN HIS manifesto James Peck spoke of a gap "between those who have and those who do not" and at Monday evening's press conference he referred to the gap between councillors and the public.

He later explained what he meant: "If you are a councillor I think you should still be immersed in the community, you should still see these problems and feel the disillusionment.

"I think we've seen it before not just this council - that when elected they kind of create their own social class and I think you still have to stay in touch with those who put you in your position. For me, I would stay in touch with the people who put me in that position of responsibility. I think you have to still be around them."

He spoke of the benefits that working with community leaders can bring: "You can go to certain areas for example within sport or other leisure activities or clubs, (where) you can identify who are nearly community leaders and say 'how can we deal with this dissatisfaction, how can we put a smile on people's faces who feel powerless?' I think you can identify half a dozen people in the community and say 'let's try and sort it out'. You don't need lots of money, you just need to listen, really."





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'I would fight importation of low-paid workers'

IN A report commissioned by the Chamber of Commerce, the government's former Economic Advisor, Dr Mike Harte, recommends a target-based immigration policy for the Falklands.

While he said he agreed with a number of Dr Harte's recommendations, candidate John Birmingham said he "thoroughly disagreed" with Dr Harte's comments on the importation of low-paid workers. He commented: "I don't want there to be a two level economy here and would very much fight against that, given the chance. That was particularly the piece [of the report] I felt was not palatable."

However, he added that the report itself should be taken seriously by councillors.

'I can be a councillor and a doctor'

SHOULD a doctor be allowed to stand for election? Is it really possible to do both jobs without one or the other suffering?

Dr Richard Davies believes it is possible and it is best to have as wide a range of people from the community as possible represented on council.

"I think you want people from blue collar backgrounds, from white collar backgrounds, as wide a range of experience that you can get. Particularly in a small community like this, you want as big a pool as possible to choose your councillors from, so you have a good choice of people who can represent you and fight your battles both internally and externally."

Dr Davies feels he has worked effectively as a councillor and as a doctor: "People can make up their own minds as to whether I have served them properly as a councillor on January 3."

He said he decided to do a job share at the hospital well before the election: "I would have done that job share three days a week whether I had been elected or not."

He added: "When people see me less of the time in the hospital it's

because I'm no longer working full time. In fact, because of criticism I had on this issue, I did an analysis of the last year's medical rota recently and I can reassure people that I am actually working more than the 60% of my time that I am contracted to do.

"I believe I work better and more effectively for not being a full time doctor. I believe I enjoy the job more for doing it part time."

'ExCo should consist of all eight members'

ROGER EDWARDS believes the portfolio structure recently adopted by councillors will fail to improve scrutiny. So how would he do it better?

He commented: "The way the portfolios were set out was all based on the five (non-ExCo) councillors being the scrutineers. ExCo consists of three elected members and two of those can pass a vote - it's just a straight majority vote.

"So if you get one strong character in ExCo who can persuade one of the other two, the vote is passed and it is too late then to go back to the rest of the Legislative Council for scrutiny - it is done, the decision is made at ExCo."

The solution, he said, would be to have all eight councillors on ExCo. "Presently two people on ExCo can make decisions. If you had all eight councillors sitting on ExCo - and there's no reason why you shouldn't - then it would take five to force an item through."

He added: "I'm a great believer also that we should be allowed much

more debate. There would be more debate if there were all eight councillors there.

"You can't scrutinise after the event - once they have taken the decision, the vote is cast after ExCo, it is in concrete."

On the 3rd of January 2008 at 1730 pm, the newly built Royal Marines Monument will be dedicated at a short ceremony to be held in the triangle on Ross Road adjacent to Government House. A number of VIPs and serving Royal Marines from UK will be present.

Two Royal Marine Buglers and a detachment of Royal Marines from HMS *Endurance* will be attending. Local dignatories, donors and sponsors are being invited to witness the ceremony.

Members of the public arc cordially invited to be in position around the monument by 1725 pm on the 3rd January 2008 to partake in this unique occasion.

What are the impacts of positive discrimination in employment?

A PAPER clarifying the government's policy on preferential appointments for posts in the Civil Service is to be circulated to allow the public to assess its impacts.

In her speech to the motion for adjournment at the last meeting of Legislative Council, Cllr Andrea Clausen asked for debate on the policy.

The policy, taken from the Management Code, says preference for employment in the civil service will be given in the following order:

• 1) a Falkland Islander, having status (FIS);

• 2) a person who holds a Permanent Resident Permit (PRP) or their spouse, who is resident in the Falklands

3) others.

According to the policy, where an appointment panel is faced with a choice between a status holder or a PRP holder and a work or residence permit holder, the person highest on the preference list above should be appointed provided that he/she meets the minimum person specifications for the job.

With regard to private sector employment, the Principal Immigration Officer is guided by the Immigration Ordinance in the exercise of his judgement on work permits. He deems people with FIS and PRPs to have the same entitlement to work, as they are all free from immigration restrictions.

According to the paper which is being circulated, in coming to a view on whether it is necessary for an employer to engage a non-resident, he is guided by the principle that the "essential minimum person specification" should be proven.

Because many employers do not have detailed person specifications like the government uses this is often based on a job advert and the broad outlines of particular post.

Sometimes employers are taken to task for what is seen as overspecification of the duties and requirements for a particular post.

PRP moratorium

A further one year moratorium on the issue of Permanent Residence Permits from January 26, 2008 is to be made.

Cllr Clausen said the reasons for this moratorium have not changed from those set down for the previous moratorium. "Furthermore, some of the fundamental areas yet to be resolved are linked to Falkland Island Status and the routes to which are currently under review within the Constitutional negotiations with the FCO."

Improvements to be made to Stanley airport

OVER the past 25 years regulatory aviation requirements have become more robust and the Falkland Islands has not always met the requirements laid down.

To address this, Executive Council has approved a number of requests that will enable FIG to satisfy the legal requirements under the recently published OTARs.

Civil Aviation in the Falklands is governed by legislation (Air Navigation (Overseas Territories) Order 2001 and international conventions and standards to which the UK as a State has agreed to comply.

Councillor Andrea Clausen said she and her colleagues on ExCo agreed that the Stanley Aerodrome should be certificated and that the runway should be extended to the west so that the Visual Control Room is compliant. "Funding for the runway extension is already within budget (in that resurfacing will take place in a different area to that originally planned)," Cllr Clausen said.

"Additional funding of £15,000 to mitigate against the glare and reflection in the existing VCR and for the installation of runway lighting was also recommended to Standing Finance Committee (SFC)." Cllr Clausen said consideration of which Fire and Rescue category the aerodrome would meet was deferred until they have the FIGAS strategic review which is due in March 2008.

"However, Members accepted that the current arrangements for Fire and Safety cover were unsatisfactory and so recommended to SFC that funding be provided for the recruitment of a part time fire officer ($\pounds 12,000$ per annum) and for the appropriate training ($\pounds 16,000$) to be carried out," she added.

Telly: a charge will be made

A CHARGE will be made to viewers for the provision of the television service from BFBS.

Following consultation with the public the project will now proceed so that progress can be made over the summer months with the purchase and installation of equipment.

Executive Council agreed that a charge should be made for the service but have requested a further paper with options on fee levels and operational issues to come to their January meeting.

Deputy Headteacher to be recruited for FICS

AS A result of the recent schools inspection undertaken by the Service Children's Education (SCE), a number of recommendations have been approved to meet some of the objectives laid down in the inspection reports.

These include that an interim Deputy Headteacher be seconded or recruited from the UK for one year to create additional management capacity to support the improvements necessary in the FICS, that the Director of Education seeks support from SCE to conduct a progress review in FICS in November 2008 and that the Director of Education meets these costs by virement from within the overall Education Service budget.

'Accidental death' verdict in Youth receives inquest into 2006 incident

A TEENAGER who was killed in a car accident might still have been alive today had the road she was driving on been designated, an inquest has heard. A verdict of accidental death

was delivered by Her Majesty's Coroner Alison Thompson on Monday at the inquest into the death of teenager Helen McKay.

Helen, the sixteen year old daughter of Mike and Jeannie Mckay, died instantly when the vehicle she was driving left the road near Goose Green in the early hours of March 1, 2006.

None of the occupants of the vehicle were wearing seatbelts when it rolled through the air all three were thrown from the vehicle and this highlighted a serious issue, Miss Thompson said. She commented: "It is unlikely

this incident would have happened at all had this road been licensed." She said that as long as the road remained undesignated there could be no controls over the wearing of seatbelts, speed or driving by unlicensed people.

She added: "It is hoped attention will be given in relation to that - it could have saved Helen's life.'

The inquest was first opened and adjourned on March 3, 2006; on Monday Miss Thompson, apologised to Helen's family and friends for the "unacceptable delay" in resuming the inquest, which she said should have been held at the very latest within six months of her death.

After considering evidence from the two boys who had been travelling in the car with Helen and a number of other people involved in the incident and the emergency response, Miss Thompson said there were essential facts which were undisputed - that Helen (who did not have a licence) was killed while travelling shortly after midnight on the road from Goose Green to North Arm, around 1.8 miles from the Goose Green bypass junction.

She said she relied heavily on the evidence of Stefen Clarke, Helen's friend, who suffered only minor injuries in the accident. It was he who raised the alarm and attempted CPR on Helen while he awaited the arrival of the emergency services.

The other occupant of the car. Duane Evans, also gave evidence at the inquest, however he was

able to remember very little from the night due to his injuries.

Although she was formally pronounced dead at 3.20am on March 1, Miss Thompson said she was satisfied that Helen died instantly at the scene and did not suffer, something she hoped would be of some comfort to her family.

The vehicle was examined after the accident and no mechanical fault was found. It was clear, Miss Thompson said, that the driver of the vehicle had lost control - but it was not known whether this was through speed or some other reason, such as poor road surface or a lack of concentration

There was some discussion over whether Helen had actually been driving the vehicle at the time of the accident.

Giving evidence. Helen's mother, Jeannie, said she was not looking to apportion blame for the accident, but she could not rest until she knew for certain whether Helen had been driving the vehicle or not. However the Coroner said she accepted the evidence from Stefen Clarke that Helen had been the driver.

supervision order

A TWELVE month supervision order has been placed on a young man after he pleaded guilty to a charge of theft.

The boy, who received the order in the youth court on Tuesday, will be supervised by the Social Work Department and mentored by a police officer during his time offduty.

His case had previously been adjourned to allow for presentence reports to be prepared.

The Senior Magistrate said she hoped the supervision order would be beneficial to the youth.

In admitting the theft, the boy was also committing a breach of a conditional discharge he received in recent months.

The Senior Magistrate said there would be no penalty for this, as it had been superseded by the supervision order.

Help for Golden Shears men

EXECUTIVE Council has approved a request to support two local competitors at the Golden Shears Competition.

A contribution of £1,178 will be made from the donations and subventions vote to allow two top Falklands shearers to travel to Norway for the competition.

Jellytots will meet again in the new year, on Tuesday, January 8 at 1.30 pm.





Oil companies prepare for drilling

BHP BILLITON and Falkland Oil and Gas (FOGL) representatives will visit the Falklands in January to establish contact with FIG and businesses that will be involved in exploration drilling. Director of Minerals Phyl

Rendell told the Mineral Resources Committee on Monday that FOGL Chief Executive Tim Bushell will be with the group and it is anticipated that the team will be available to host a public meeting.

She said it would be a busy week beginning January 21 and added: "Thope there will be a pleasing outcome by the end of the year for everyone.

Giving an update on her department's activities. Mrs Rendell said Desire Petroleum had completed a site survey programme The company now had environmental and health and safety data for their northern licences as well as site survey data over their southern licences in the north.

"An environmental impact assessment (EIA) is being compiled for the southern prospects in readiness for seeking approval to drill," she said.

Rockhopper Exploration

Rockhopper has used the vessel Bergen Surveyor to carry out a site survey over the prospects Ernest and Weddell and has been working in conjunction with Desire Petroleum to produce an EIA for their licensed acreage adjacent to Desire's blocks. "It's good to see the maximum use of the Wavefield Inseis vessel while it is in the area," commented Mrs Rendell.

Meanwhile the company is on track with interpretation of the 3D seismic data acquired in their northern licence where Shell drilled two

Don't leave sheep to suffer by the road

THE Chief of Police has reminded drivers that they must report any incidents in which animals are struck by vehicles.




Councillors will fly business class when necessary

Dancers hope for a trouble-free year of classes

THE Scottish and Traditional dance group is to host a dance during the Christmas holiday to welcome home students from overseas.

It is the first event organised by the group for some time, after they had to stop holding their classes.

Dancer Karen Rimicans explained that the group's regular Wednesday evening classes had to be stopped in September 2007 due to vandalism and other problematic behaviour that was happening while the classes were taking place at the Infant and Junior School Hall.

The group switched venues and tried the Trough on a Friday evening, but found that neither adults nor children were attending, so they took a break for a while. Karen said the adults who attend the classes want to dance and not have to constantly police the behaviour of the youngsters: "Plus, the school were getting fed up with the vandalism, smoking and other antisocial behaviour within the school and grounds. In many ways, we became a victim of our own success."

However after much discussion among the group organisers, they have agreed that having a class that both adults and young people can enjoy is still important: "We don't wish to exclude children - the many shouldn't suffer because of the behaviour of a few individuals."

They have decided to try the

classes again in 2008, having blocks of six weekly sessions in the Town Hall, on Wednesday evenings.

The sessions will run from 7pm till 9pm and under 16s can attend until 8pm while the over 16s and adults can stay on. Karen added: "We would like

Karen added: "We would like to attract a volunteer to help support the classes, by being available to take the entrance fee of £1 and help monitor the venue. So if someone out there enjoys traditional music and would like to help us, please contact either John Birmingham, Derek Howatt or me.

"We would also ask that younger children - Year 8 and below - are accompanied by a parent or guardian. Having more adults does help improve the behaviour of the class."

Karen said the dancers were grateful to those who had helped the group over the years: "Especially Nick Barrett and the staff at the school who kindly let us use the venue at the school for so long."

long." They will celebrate the end of this year and beginning of next year with a dance, on December 29. Karen said: "It will be a Home Coming Dance to help celebrate the return of many folks to the Islands for the holiday season.

"We are hoping to have some live music too. So please come along and have a great night."



Romeo Pauloni - prolific painter and a good sport

IF YOU had been making your way across the Falklands during the summers of the 1960s or 1970s, chances are that you would have bumped into Romeo walking with his dog, making his way from farm to farm, helping out in the shed during shearing, painting or even occasionally cooking, such was his versatility.

Romeo was born to William and Helen Pauloni on October 7, 1920 at Teal Creek, Goose Green, the youngest of five children. He had two sisters Vi and Ethel and two brothers William and Bobby.

He spent his youth there with his parents, leaving to work at Goose Green when he was sixteen. Never a keen horseman his work was always in the navvy gang.

He left Goose Green at the start of World War II and came to Stanley to join the Falkland Islands Defence Force. Postings included Charles Point. Mt Low and Ordnance Point.



When the opportunity came to join His Majesty's Forces he enlisted along with several of his friends, joining the Royal Navy

An anniversary-inspired poem

This poem was written by Henry Whyte, an Officiating Chaplain to the Forces, who visited the Islands at the beginning of October. The trip to the Falklands was a gift to Henry in recognition of the work he does with the military forces.

SAN CARLOS

The sun is bright, the sea is blue, The wind is strong and on the hills The sheep graze undisturbed While penguins nest to lay their eggs Down by the shore. It is a scene of beauty, Calm and peace, as lovely and as quiet As almost any that the human eye may see.

Is this the place where thousands came ashore With pounding hearts and loaded guns? Is this the place where battle raged And screaming jets fought overhead? Is this the place where bombs were dropped, Where flesh was burned, where men cried out And surgeons worked to save and heal? Is this the place where ships were sunk And lives were lost beneath the waves? Is this the place on which so many eyes were fixed, A place where two great nations met to fight, A place whose name is known around the world?

It is the place and on the hill above Blue Beach The tale is told by graves of those who fell. They died so young and with their names Are written words of pride and pain and love. The tale is also told in the museum And on the face of one who landed here Those five and twenty years ago. He has returned to see the place which changed his life. He lost four friends with whom he served. And some are buried here. He goes to where they lie but soon he leaves. "I'm sorry but I cannot stay." He walks away with pain that overwhelms. serving primarily in the North Atlantic. Here was a man that not only served his country but served it with pride.

When the War drew to a close he returned to the Falklands and enlisted in the Merchant Navy serving for a time on the William Scoresby during the later part of Operation Tabarin in the Antarctic, later moving to the Lafonia and Fitzroy before settling once again on dry land in the early 1950's to live at home with his mother, following the death of his father. He worked for the Falkland Islands Company on the East Jetty for several years before heading back to work in the Camp.

During his time in the Royal Navy, Romeo took up boxing as a sport. He will be remembered as a good competitor in the competitions that were held regularly in the gymnasium, particularly against visiting Naval ships.

He was a particularly skilled opponent and known to win most of his bouts. He was also a great fan of the world boxing scene and kept scrap books of boxers and their history.

Romeo was a prolific painter, working in water colours and simple pencil sketches. His work has been admired by many and has won him accolades at various exhibitions in the Falklands. Romeo encouraged young people at school to endeavour with painting through his annual sponsorship of prizes for landscape painting.

His other talent was as a musician. Playing Scottish music on his accordion was his passion. Two-nighters and Camp Sports dances would see him line up to play alongside the many talented players of his day. Many will have fond memories of such occasions, shaking a leg to the Scottish reels and waltzes in various venues across the Falklands. Those were the good old days.

Romeo and Hilary were married at his house on Fitzroy Road on December 24, 1985. Their love of the Camp took them to various farms helping out with the cooking and shed work during the shearing.

Having a keen eye, he was always on the look out for that special landscape or deep sunset to busy himself with during the long winter evenings, which in later years took up a substantial amount of his time.

While we mourn his passing, we have the joy of remembering him. May he rest in peace.

Iris Green



IRIS was born at North Arm on January 19, 1941 to William Roberts and Nora (nee McCarthy).

She was seven years old before she attended school in Stanley when her parents moved there from the Camp. Her mother died when she was 15, and the running of the family household fell to her.

William decided to relocate to New Zealand and together with Russell, Iris and Keith they moved there in 1958. Iris's eldest brother Edgar, together with his wife Avril Evans, also moved to New Zealand via South Georgia and Scotland. Ins worked for the FIC Millinery Store before leaving the Falklands.

She worked in New Zealand for five years where she trained in hotel management before moving to Sydney, Australia, and working at the Australia Hotel.

During her time there she met the owner of a hotel in the British Solomon Islands who offered her the position of manageress of the Mendana Hotel in Honiara. Iris took up a two year contract there in 1963.

Her father died near the end of her two years in Honiara and she then came back to New Zealand and hitch hiked both islands before returning to Sydney where she worked as a ground hostess for Pan American Airways. She was again approached to return to Honiara which she did in 1967.

In 1968 she met John Green, a bank officer with the Commonwealth Bank and they were married on January 10, 1970. They returned to Australia soon after and made their home in Brisbane. Their only child Kelly was born in 1974.

In 1976 John resigned from the bank and they bought their first newsagency at North Ipswich which they ran for five years. They owned three more newsagencies over the next thirteen years and left that industry in 1994. Kelly also completed her nursing training in that same year.

Iris loved her shops which she made sure were managed and run to the highest degree.

Iris and John then moved on to thirteen acres at Wamuran where they grew small crops for eight years before retiring to Macleay Island in 2003 where her husband still lives.

Wool market report for week ending December 14, By Peter Johnson, Department of Agriculture

THE wool market continued its rise of the last few weeks, and all categories closed higher compared to last weeks figures. The AWEX "Eastern Market

Indicator" (EMI) finished at 433.2 pence per kilogram clean, up compared with last week's 428.3 p/kg. The EMI closed at above 1000 Australian cents, the first time it has done so this season.

Demand was strong from both China and European buyers with a 90% clearance rate in Australian sales and 85% clearance in New Zealand.

There will be a sale recess over Christmas. Sales begin again on the 9th of January in Australia with 54,400 bales on offer and on the 16th of January, 10,500 bales will go under the hammer in South Africa.






