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Buckle up

AN anomaly was recently identified in the law requiring adults (over 14 years) to wear seat belts.

It appears that the seat belt law was amended in May 2006, with the intention of extending the law requiring persons to wear seat belts across the whole of the Islands. It was recently discovered that unfortunate errors in drafting the amended law meant that the effect was to remove any obligation on adults to wear seat belts. That situation was clearly never the policy intention behind the 2006 amendment to the law.

Having discovered this legal loophole the Wearing of Seat Belts (Amendment) Regulations 2008 were drafted and were approved by resolution of Legislative Council on September 26, so that with immediate effect from that time the wearing of seat belts is indeed a legal requirement for all adult and child motorists – drivers and pascentures.

Identification of the anomaly in the law does potentially affect a very small number of past prosecutions for seat belt offences. Executive Council has therefore invited the Governor to exercise his power to refer these cases to the Supreme Court for review under the Criminal Justice (Amendment) (Miscarriages of Justice) Ordinance 2006.

Superintendent of the Royal Falkland Islands Police, Paul Elliott said: "The road safety education programme of recent months appears to have paid off so that thankfully the majority of motorists continued to wear seat belts, even after it became apparent that the legal basis for this requirement was flawed.

"Let's not forget that the wearing of seat belts is a matter of common sense." he said. "Strict enforcement of the seat belt law will remain a priority for the police to ensure compliance with this common sense and life preserving measure is maintained".

An accident on Wednesday morning where a Cable and Wireless Land Rover left the MPA road and rolled over provided the latest testimony to the fact that seat belts save lives. The driver and passenger of the vehicle walked away with minor cuts and bruises despite extensive damage to their vehicle.

HMG respond to President Kirchner

THE United Nations UK delegation have replied to the remarks made by the Argentine President Cristina Kirchner at the UN's General Assembly, published in last week's Penguin News

"The British Government attaches great importance to the principle of self-determination as set out in Article 1.2 of the Charter of the United Nations and Article 1 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights. That principle underlies our position on the Falkland Islands," said a spokesperson.

"The Falkland Islands are not a colonial enclave. Britain's overseas territories are British for as long as they want to remain British. The people of the Falkland Islands have chosen to retain their link with Britain.

"The democratically elected representatives of the Falkland Islands once again expressed their own views clearly when they visited the United Nations for this year's debate in the Committee of 24. They asked the Committee to recognise that they, like any other people, were entitled to exercise the right of self-determination. They reiterated that the people of the Falkland Islands did not wish for any change in the status of the Islands.

"There can be no negotiations on the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands unless and until such time as the Islanders so wish," said the spokesperson, adding, "The United Kingdom has no doubt about its sovereignty over the Falkland Islands,"

FIG investments safe

IN the Falklands, with an economy largely based on the export of primary products such as wool and fish, we are used to being at the mercy of global factors beyond our control. However, the fact that unlike the majority of countries in the world we have money in the bank and no national debt - indeed interest on FIG's investments is its second biggest source of income has given us a feeling of security, until now.

Recently, however, with financial institutions crashing like packs of cards or requiring multi-billion dollar bale-outs, even those who don't really know the difference between the "Footsy" and a fluffy kitten, will have caught something of the prevailing nervousness.

Thinking beyond the personal questions - 'What is going to happen to my mortgage, my life savings or my job?' - the next obvious

and equally troubling question is: 'What's the position of the Falkland Islands Government's investments''

"Not brilliant, but not disastrous," was the assessment of Councillor Mike Summers, Acting Chairman of last week's meeting of Standing Finance Committee (SFC), on the basis of an interim report on FIG's investments presented to the SFC by the Treasury's Financial Services Manager, Stmon Wilkie.

Newly returned Financial Secretary, Keith Padgett, told the meeting that the situation, "...could have been significantly worse." He added that the Government's investments were being well-managed for stable, long-term growth by Newtons and HSBC, who had both, at his request, recently written to assure him of the security of their positions despite the current situation.

"We trained hard but it seemed that every time we were getting to form up in teams, we would be re-organised. I was to learn later in life that we tend to meet any new situation by re-organising. And, a wonderful illusion it can be for creating the illusion of progress while producing confusion, inefficiency, and demoralisation." (Gaius Petronius 64 AD)

I was on holiday and so missed the first time that Councillor Birmingham demonstrated the breadth of his classical knowledge to LegCo, but he did it again last week and I found the above quotation aptly confirming my own fears about the cumulative effect the current proliferation of focus groups, strategic think tanks and consultative processes in the Falklands

might be having on the people involved in them.

The new Economic Strategy Development Process, for example, involves a "core group" which represents something over 2% of the total civilian population and receives reports from a further six satellite groups. as well as claiming to link in with the Councillors' Update of the Islands' Plan, the Treasury's Medium Term Financial Plan, the Rural Development Strategy, the Transport Strategy, the Department of Agriculture's Business Plan, the Education Improvement Plan, the FIGAS Review, the FIMCO/ Woolco Review, the Port Development Strategy, the National Tourism Strategy and the New Immigration Policy, several of which are themselves still in the development process

So many people would appear to be involved in planning and policy meetings that one wonders who is 'minding the store' while all this is going on and why the new Mental Health Strategy is not mentioned; it is surely

going to be relevant.

The problem is that it is hard to argue against the need for planning, or against worthy causes such as the regeneration of the Camp economy, but what worries me and Cllr Birmingham (and, believe me, I worry about agreeing with Cllr Birmingham) is the amount of time taken in re-inventing a number of glaringly obvious wheels, without ever finally getting

them onto the national cart and rolling.

Given five minutes, we could probably all scribble down on the back of a cigarette packet the things that need to happen to promote economic growth and social development in the Falklands and find ourselves in broad agreement. These things, like better communications, population growth, diversification, inward investment, etc. are constant. What do change and keep on changing rapidly, are the external circumstances, sometimes lending new relevance to old ideas or, alternatively, rendering them unviable. Some of these are beyond our control, like global, economic or meteorological climates, but others, like the East-West Ferry, we have brought about ourselves.

If our institutions do not develop corporate memories,we will never get the planning process synchronised with the speed at which our circumstances change. Starting, each time, from the very beginning, instead of from where we left off, threatens permanent "Ground Hog Day" in the Falklands, fostering, not progress, but, "the illusion of progress while

producing confusion, inefficiency, and demoralisation.

What is Falklands culture?



IN the recent Immigration Survey commissioned by the Media Trust, 35% of the 596 respondents commented on their frustrations at the 'dilution' of Falklands culture due to immigration.

The average age of respondents to the survey was 47, with 62% of them being born in the Falklands and one wonders if the fear of a diluted culture is particularly prevalent among this last age group to experience the old Falklands, before the massive wave of change that followed the 1982 war.

Janet Robertson, the councillor responsible for Immigration feels that if there had been more respondents to the survey from a younger age group, the view might have been different. Young people, Janet thinks, have a completely different view of what Falklands culture is, "They have a more cosmopolitan feel for it," she added.

The fact remains that without immigration we wouldn't have a culture and certainly not such a diverse one. The Islands have always depended on immigrants to boost the work force, and bring many skills and cultures with them. Just look at the telephone book to see the many Scottish and Scandinavian names that dominate the pages.

It has set us and others to thinking and of late, hours have been whiled away trying to establish exactly what Falklands culture is. Interestingly, from the wide range of people we've asked, whether born in the Islands, with recently or distantly acquired status, or only here for the short term, the one thing that gets mentioned most frequently is Camp and the

freedom to enjoy it.

Those who lived and worked in the Islands, particularly in the Camp, prior to and soon after 1982 immediately conjure up memories of large groups of shepherds leaving the stable in the early morning, hordes of dogs afoot, the snorting of impatient horses (and shepherd bosses too on occasion), idyllic summer days driving a flock of sheep, surrounded by the smell of warm peaty earth and teaberries and a large roast cooking slowly in the peat fuelled cooker to go home to.

That is not to say there is not a Stanley culture, there has to be; some people have lived all their lives in Stanley and have no great desire to go further afield.

The traditional Falklands way of life, particularly in Camp, is derived from the mix of an essentially South American agricultural and social system, operated by people with an unparalleed ferocious sense of Britishness, under a quintessentially British colonial regime.

The changes we are going through would face any country that had experienced the same rate of development as the Falklands have in the last 26 years. While we need to embrace the changes, we also want to preserve traditions and culture as far as possible. But, to do that we need to establish exactly what it is about the Falklands that makes it different

Adjournments

A CASE against Adrian Minnell, who is accused of an assault causing actual bodily harm on Carol Lynda Jane Buckland, was adjourned till October 15, on Wednesday, following a plea by defence counsel, David Lang to be given time to read the papers of the case in order to instruct his client.

Jason Morris, who was represented in court by Richard Marlor, also faced charges of assault occasioning actual bodily harm. At the request of Prosecuting Counsel, Trevor Archer and with Mr Marlor's agreement, this case was adjourned for twenty-one days to allow investigations described as, "likely to lead to further prosecution" to be completed.

A further adjournment till October 15, pending the arrival of a report from a British expert, Professor Nicholas Birch, was granted in the case of Mrs Jeanette Macaskill, who faces charges of drink driving.

Richard Marlor, acting for Mrs
Macaskill, was urged by the Senior
Magistrate to make Professor Birch
aware of the urgency of the matter.

Speeding offences
Martyn Gilson-Clarke, who appeared in court in person, was disqualified from driving for seven days, fined £276 and ordered to pay £70 costs for driving on Ross Road East at a speed indicated by the police laser gun to be 48 miles per hour.

Three other Stanley men pleaded guilty by letter to having driven at speeds in excess of the 25 mph limit:

Christian Williams was fined £120, plus costs of £70, after admitting driving at 35mph on Ross Road West, just after noon on September 9.

Peter James Crowie admitted driving at 37mph on Davis Street on the evening of September 14 and was fined £200, plus costs of £70. Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds noted that Davis Street was a built-up area with frequent parked cars, but acknowledged that on the occasion of the offence, Mr Crowie's first, the traffic was light.

first, the traffic was light.

John Stuart Henry also admitted speeding on Davis Street, having been recorded on a laser gun travelling at 35mph.

While admitting speeding, Mr Henry claimed in his letter to the court that he had been misled by his speedometer into believing that his speed was only 30mph.

Mr Henry was also fined £200, together with the £70 costs claimed by the prosecution.

Limited development for now on leading lights green space

ALTHOUGH planning permission for up to 12 houses on the site in East Stanley known as Leading Lights was granted in September by the Planning and Building Committee, subject to the re-location and re-configuration of the two navigation lights, at the expense of FIG, ExCo decided on Friday that only the five individual building plots at the northern and southern edges of the area, known as 28 and 30 Hansen Hill and 13, 15 and 17 Sulivan Street should be advertised for sale by tender, subject to the standard conditions.

They also agreed that the seven central plots should not be offered for sale by tender until progress was made on the development of the various residential sites already held on building licence from FIG and determined that tenders should not be accepted from persons already holding residential building licences from FIG, but that preference should be given to owner-occupiers.

Members recognised that this development was a departure from the adopted Stanley Town Plan as the land is defined currently as green space, but noted that the Planning and Building Committee had agreed that the Leading Lights green space should be proposed for re-designation for residential development as an amendment to the Town Plan.

Luis Maximiliano Olmos Balladares Maxi to his Falklands friends

IT was with great sadness that his many friends in the Falkland Islands learned on Wednesday that 29 year-old Maxi Olmos had passed away that morning, in a Valparaiso hospital, after contracting bronchial pneumonia.

Since a tragic accident on the road to North Arm, almost three years ago, left Maxi without speech and almost totally incapacitated, his devoted family and friends have continued to care for him and to hope and campaign for treatments, which might bring about a recovery of the cheerful, energetic and lively young man, who will now be remembered with such affection, both in his native Chile and in the Falkland Is-

membered with such affection, both in his native Chile and in the Falkland Islands.

The bank account set up locally in support of Maxi and his family has now been closed and the balance of £1000 sent to his family to help defray funeral expenses.

Maxi's family have asked *Penguin News* to pass on their appreciation and thanks for all the support they have received over the past difficult years, from Maxi's supporters and friends in the Falklands.

The organisers of the Maxi fund have asked that those monies still in collection, boxes around town, please be donated to another charity.

Government investments are safe

While there had been a £3m (1.7%) downward movement in the market value of FIG's investments between the end of June and September 16, this compared well with a 7.5% fall in value in the FTSE 100 over the same period.

The mixture of shares, government bonds and cash in which the government's reserves were kept, ensured relative protection from stock market fluctuations and the actual value of shares would in any case only be crystalised should they be sold. There was a tendency also for government bonds and cash to do

well, when shares were doing badly.

Government funds placed with banks were, in effect, held in trust, said the Financial Secretary. This segregation, or ring-fencing meant that even should a bank go into receivership, the administrators would not be able to seize the FIG's reserves.

Midweek ferry cancelled

WHILE West Falkland ferry users were left out on a limb this week so Concordia Bay could attempt to supply Sea Lion Island, Councillor for transport, John Birmingham, has defended the decision to cancel the midweek run.

"It's unfortunate that by helping some people we have made difficulties for others," he said.

The Government Chief Executive, Tim Thorogood, made the decision to cancel the Wednesday ferry run after explaining to councillors the difficulties that Sea Lion Island was encountering.

"Sea Lion Island was running very low on essential stores and materials for repairs and maintenance," Cllr Birmingham said, adding that it was not a new thing for the island to be difficult to access due to weather conditions.

Sea Lion Island has not had a visit from Concordia Bay since she became operational in early July. There was no cargo booked for the first schedule so was not included. The vessel has been trying to get into Sea Lion Island since the end of August but weather conditions and heavy swell have prevented cargo from being landed.

Councillor Birmingham apologised for the inconvenience to ferry users and said he was hopeful the vessel would not be taken off schedule too often in the future.

On Thursday Concordia Bay was still off Sea Lion Island awaiting suitable conditions to off-load.

Former FGML reduces losses

STILL searching for work in warmer climes, after leaving these shores last year, exploration company, BPC Ltd, formerly Falkland Gold and Minerals Ltd, has narrowed its losses from £1.3million last year to \$948,832.

According to analysts, the company will focus during the next six months on continuing farm-out negotiations and securing the additional five exploration licences in the Bahamas it has applied for.

Cash reserves as of June 30 were about \$1.03 million. (TFN)

Falklands 2009

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Restoration for Camber railway engines

AFTER years stored in a container, following an earlier time submerged in Stanley harbour, the two trny "Wren "class steam locomotives, which once hauled equally small carriages along the railway line that ran from the Camber to Moody Brook, are to be salvaged and restored.

Last week ExCo gave permission to the Museum and National Trust to accept a deal offered by a

British engineering company, Alex Engineering, to cosmetically restore and return one of the engines in exchange for becoming owners of the other.

The Camber railway was constructed before World Warl and used to transport coal and construction materials from the Royal Navy's coaling station at the Camber to their transmitter station at Moody Brook.

Wind of change for Civil Service contracts

WHILE agreeing an annual pay award for civil servants of 2.5%, effective from July, members of Executive Council last week also studied a number of recommendations as to how the current pay structure could be adapted to cope with difficulties in recruiting for specific posts.

Market Related Pay (MRP) was considered, but it was agreed that this would be complicated and that alternatives such as enhanced contractual gratuities and development of the Job Evaluation Scheme were two ways in which the salaries for posts that are difficult to fill could be made more attractive.

ExCo also agreed to the introduction of flexible contracts of between one, three or even five years, though it was acknowledged that this provision could be "problematical" in relation to work permit regulations and was not, therefore, an immediately practical option.

A proposal to resurrect Performance Related Pay (PRP) also met with ExCo approval, with the caveat that its introduction should be delayed until performance management training had taken place sufficiently widely for the process to be "systematic, justifiable and manageable."

This, members agreed, might take several years to implement, but they hoped to see a possible introduction in 2010-11, starting with the top salary bands.

£250,000 overdraft approved for FLH

EXCO gave approval last week for an application by Falkland Landholdings for an overdraft facility with Standard Chartered Bank of up to £250,000.

Councillor Rendell's report on ExCo's proceedings states: "It was reported that this requirement has come about as a result of an oversight when drawing up financial statements some time ago, which have only just been spotted.

Members were also advised that there would be a revue of the FLH Recovery Plan before the end of the year. This would be an in depth review examining not only the physical and financial performance of the Corporation, but also making recommendations on future modes of operation and ownership.

Ocean 8 salvage plan

THE Chief Executive reported to Executive Council that a salvage plan for the sunken trawler Ocean & had just been received from the P&I Club.

Members agreed that an FI-appointed consultant should examine the plan in detail to ensure that it would achieve a full recovery of the oil remaining on the vessel.

Your questions answered

Q DURING the current difficult financial times, could the government please disclose the amount of money they have spent annually on this council's IT requirements. Specifically, hardware and software, including recent orders?

A Clerk of Councils Claudette Anderson-Prior supplied the following information.

60.665 has been spent on 8 laptops and the required software for this Council's IT requirements since November 2005. Three of those laptops have to date been returned to the Computer Section for recycling within other departments.

The Legislature Department has received upgrades of monitors and printers in line with government departmental upgrades.

Q WHAT are the laws on the importation of dangerous dogs such as the Rotweiller into the Falklands?

A Crown Counsel Trevor Archer replied

THERE is no outright prohibition on the importation of Rotweillers into the Falklands. However, any dog kept in a town must have a licence. Therefore, anybody considering importing a dog would be advised to consider making enquiries to the Director of Agriculture about obtaining a licence, before the dog is brought into the Falklands.

If there is no law in place at the moment are there any being considered?

There are no laws currently pro-

posed for the restriction on the importation into the Falkland Islands of dogs which might be considered dangerous.

Q THE Department of Agriculture's - Falkland Islands Farming Statistics 2007-2008 shows "Elephant Beach - Figures withheld."

Who has withheld the figures and why? Does this breach Section 40 of the Live Stock Ordinance? When will the figures be released?

A Director of Agriculture, Phyl Rendell provided the following information.

ELEPHANT Beach stock return for 2007/08 was submitted to the Department of Agriculture, as required by the Live Stock Ordinance, but the farm, after taking legal advice, requested that the information should not be published.

The Ordinance does not provide authority for the information to be published. However, records of non-financial farm statistics have been published continuously since 1900. The Director, in consultation with the Attorney General, Agricultural Committee members and the RBA will be recommending to Councillors that the Ordinance is amended before next year's stock returns are submitted at the end of June to ensure that the Government can publish the figures.

Many farmers have commented that the published figures are one of the few bench marking tools available to them.

FIGAS shuttle service gets underway

THE Falkland Islands Government Air Service (FIGAS) has this week been operating a shuttle service with the North and the South of both East and West Falkland being served on a daily basis when required.

The service started on Sunday, and three days into it FIGAS General Manager Shaun Minto said that this early in the season the passenger loads are still quite light and various shuttle runs have been combined where possible in order to reduce operating costs.

This means that there can be some variability in scheduled departure times, so passengers will need to pay close attention to the checkin times on the daily flight list, he added.

Some people have been caught out by the earlier departure of the first East-West shuttle which now has a 7.30am check-in time and leaves at 8am instead of 8.30am.

"The first commercial charter flights and LAN connections under the new operating model were completed successfully over the weekend," said Mr Minto.

The Round Robin promotion which allows passengers the opportunity to travel on the complete shuttle flight and offers a great view of the Islands, has generated some positive interest and has certainly raised awareness of the late shuttle service between East and West Falkland, he concluded.

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ExCo accept squid licence proposals

MEASURES proposed by the Director of Fisheries, which are aimed at attracting new customers to the Falklands *Illex* fishery, while retaining old ones, were accepted in their entirety by ExCo last week.

The recommendations to ExCo retain the current licence fee formula for returning *Illex* vessels at 2008 levels, while setting a new formula for first-time customers, which at 5% more than the amount demanded of returning clients, is still some 6% less than would have been charged in earlier years.

Along with a small number of suggested minor adjustments to the licensing regime, which basically remains the same, ExCo spokesperson, Councillor Mike Rendell, said that a proposal had been 'floated' that Falklands registered trawlers should be able to trawl for *Illex* on B (*Illex*) licence conditions for a period chosen by the vessel owners within the prescribed full season of four months, with the fees calculated on a prorata basis.

Members accepted the recommendation that interest in this proposal should be sought from the Fisheries Committee before taking it further

Councillor Mike Rendell: Camp phones will link up on schedule

ANSWERING a question about the Camp telephone and broad band connection in Legislative Council (LegCo) last week Councillor Mike Rendell said: "Procurement of equipment for the new camp telephone and broadband service is proceeding according to plan and on time."

Despite some delays to the arrival of generators caused by changes in the *Elizabeth Boye* schedule. Cllr Rendell said that SAAS were attempting to arrange an alternative connection that could mean a small number of the generators might arrive earlier, resulting in only a minor delay at just one site.

Councillor Rendell assured listeners that despite some problems with warranties, now resolved and the late arrival of an engineer, the installation programme was proceeding well, and it was anticipated that all Camp subscribers would be connected to the new system by March 27, 2009, the planned project completion date.

Civil engineering work at some Camp sites, which had been delayed till Spring due to access and weight restrictions, would soon be under way again, said Clfr Rendell, who reported that Fitzroy was connected up to the new system in March and Mullet Creek, Camber House and Stanley Dairy had now also been connected, with positive feedback on the new broadband service.

Murrell Farm and Bluff Cove would be connected in the next two weeks and in the following two months the plans would take in nine subscribers on Fitzroy Ridge and thirty in Goose Green. Before the end of the October, he said, a further 24 subscribers at Port Howard, 34 at Fox Bay and five on Mount Kent would have been connected.

LegCo was informed that to date FIG had contributed £1,213,178 towards the project cost, which represents 83% of its total commitment (excluding £470,000 for roads).

As a general observation, Cllr Rendell claimed that 37% of the total project cost was spent on overseas equipment. 14% on third party professional services and 49% on Falkland Islands suppliers

It was anticipated, said Cllr Rendell, that the new Telecommunications Users Group would meet early this month.

Pool maintains temperature

THE addition of Phase One of the Wind Farm reduces the amount of heat available to be recovered from the water jackets of the Power Station's generators. but it is still more than would have been available in the first ten years of operation of the system, which was installed in 1989,

Councillor Birmingham gave this assurance to LegCo on Friday, in response to a question from Councillor Robertson.

The councillor explained: "During that first decade there would have been no heat available to the pool during the night, as demand for electricity meant that changing down to the smaller generating sets, which did not supply heat, was possible.

"It was anticipated that there would be a reduction in heat, but this is not to a level lower than experienced previously.

"There is a potential for boosting the swimming pool hear from excess wind power in the future.

"The swimming pool system has always called for more heat than has been available, but the suggestion of an oil-fired boost boiler has previously been rejected, on the basis that the swimming pool should only be heated from energy recovered from the Power Station, due to the potential for significant increases in operational costs.

"Heating utilising electricity generated by the Wind Farm would comply with this philosophy."

phy."
While the heat exchange system for the swimming pool was currently working efficiently. Councillor Birmingham told the meeting that the same could not be said for the separate system installed in 2006, which recovers heat from the generator engine exhaust gases and is distributed to the King Edward Memorial Hospital and the Community School.

Problems with the heat exchange units of this system were being actively addressed, said the councillor

RDS work permit hitch

WORK permit problems may delay, or even prevent, one of the newly appointed part-time development officers from taking up his post, according to a Development Corporation spokesperson.

Australian, Doug Martin, currently employed as Logistics Officer for the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCO) was appointed as part-time community development worker (CDW) for the West Falklands, after a lengthy consultative process culminating in a popular vote, but now must await the result of a work permit application before taking up the job.

The elected representatives for the East Falklands are Stanleybased company, SeaLed PR and both appointments were the subject of questions in LegCo last week.

Councillor Birmingham, who posed questions about the cost of the appointments and their duties, was told by Cllr Cockwell that the funds for the two CDW posts came from unspent balances in closed Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) projects.

Speaking on behalf of FIDC, whose Board he chairs in the temporary absence of Cllr Clausen, Cllr Cockwell said that FIDC's understanding was that the appointees would be responsible for a wide range of activities, including workshops, designed to further communication between the East and West Falkland communities, Stanley and the Core Group ultimately responsible for forming policy.

In addition, he said, the CDWs would assist in the production of progress reports on the process, undertake relevant research as required and assist in the production of the Strategy document.

Property to rent needed

A MOVE introduced by FIG to encourage building for rentals had not had the desired effect, according to John Birmingham, Councillor with the Land Use and Public Services portfolio.

Depreciation can be claimed using a 10% straight line method by owner-builders who rent out their property, but only by owner-builders.

Further ways to make building for rental more attractive would be looked at in the tax policy review due to take place very soon, promised the councillor

Replying to a question about the number of houses, both government and privately owned, that are currently unoccupied and the incentives that might be offered to owners to bring them into the rental pool, Councillor Birmingham said: "I contacted the Tax Office to see what is in place either to encourage vacant property owners to rent them out by way of tax breaks, or to discourage them from keeping them vacant by way of penalty taxation.

"The basic rule is that any costs incurred wholly and exclu-

sively for the purpose of renting the property, i.e. repairs and maintenance, mortgage interest, insurance etc can be claimed.

"Legal costs on setting up the lease etc can not be claimed, as these are classed as capital costs and no depreciation can be claimed on those costs, so they are lost.

"There are no taxes charged on property owners who have properties but don't rent them."

With regard to governmentowned properties, Cllr Birmingham said that leaving aside the allocation of sheltered accommodation, there were 17 properties that were allocated in the local pool to residents.

Substantial renovations were effected in six of these so they were vacant for more than four weeks, but if major refurbishment was not included, the average vacancy was only 12 days. 72% of Government locally allocated dwellings were available for re-let within four weeks of vacancy.

Councillor Birmingham said that he did not feel he was qualified to inform about vacant properties in the private sector and whether they were rented or not

Internet banking for overseas students?

PROBLEMS caused to Falklands overseas students by the late arrival of grants and expenses were discussed in LegCo last week.

Education Department spokesman, the Hon Richard Stevens, said that further and higher education students, along with apprentices employed by Falkland Islands Government Deparatments, all received their grant payments in monthly instalments.

Asked by Cllr Birmingham how that payment was made, Cllr Stevens said that it was by cheque paid either directly to the student or into his or her bank account.

In support of Cllr Stevens, Financial Secretary, Keith Padgett added that prompt arrival of the students' cheques was of concern to the Treasury, who aimed always to post them thirty days before the due date.

Mr Padgett admitted that problems did occasionally arise through issues outside FIG's control, like postal strikes and flight delays, but said that it would help greatly if the Falklands were part of the international internet banking system.

LegCo was told that private sector apprentices continue to be paid by their employer whilst overseas, any FIG contribution to wages being paid to the employer during that time.

Overseas apprentices also earn a wage from employment in the UK. This is organised by Chichester College.

Disapointing new Constitution with few changes

OVER recent years, there have been many good initiatives in the Falklands that have benefited the population as a whole and indeed many new ideas and projects abound that can only, if managed judiciously, be to the further benefit of Falkland Islanders. To name but a few of these initiatives I mention the Islands Plan, Rural Strategy. the Economic Development Strategy Group and not least the New Port Development project.

Regrettably, having now read the proposed Falkland Islands Constitution Order 2008, I cannot discern its proposed additional benefits, nor how in any way it advances or consolidates the powers of internal self-government in the Falklands, nor how it intends to move the Islands forward on the path towards self-determination. It is so little different in these respects from the 1985 Constitution Order that I have to wonder what its purpose, if any, is at all. In fact I see nothing that could not have been dealt with as a procedural matter of law.

Naturally I am not attempting a full analysis here, but a few constructive comments in which I express disappointment might not go amiss.

The Constitutions of Bermuda and Gibraltar give to those countries a vastly greater degree of in-

ternal self-government and rights to 'advise' the Governor when in exercise of 'special powers', or indeed any powers, than the Fl obtains for itself in the proposed 2008 Constitution Order. For example, the Executive authority in Gibraltar is the remit of the Government of Gibraltar not that of the Governor, as defined in the Falklands 2008 Constitution. In addition Gibraltar has a cast iron guarantee that ... Her Majesty's Government will never enter into arrangements under which the people of Gibraltar would pass under the sovereignty of another state against their freely and democratically expressed wishes:... written into their document. This commitment is currently not present in the published FI version.

There is also certainly an unwelcome strengthening of the powers of derogation, i.e. the overriding authority of the Government through its apparatus to take away or diminish the basic human rights of its citizens under whatever relevant circumstances it specifies under emergency and other superior powers.

It is also alarming to note that the right to grant Falkland Island Status is now qualified by the need to first be 'British'. This means that any otherwise perfectly qualified and suitable person of foreign origin who wants to apply for Falkland Island Status must initially as a process, and as a fact, get the permission of HMG by having first to become a British Citizen. then apply for FI Status. This seems to me to be a diminution of the power of FIG to decide who will or will not become ostensibly a 'citizen' of the Falklands.

British Overseas Territories Citizens per se, as far as I can see, have the right to apply for registration as British Citizens under the British Overseas Territories Act 2002. So unless the FIG has lost the basic and unique right to decide who can become a Falkland Islander (i.e. a British Overseas Territory Citizen of the Falkland Islands) then this article seems to be surplus to requirements and possibly an unwarranted FCO imposition.

I was always under the impression that the aim of the Falklands in the exercise of self-determination was to consolidate and enhance its powers of self-government in Free Association with the Government of the United Kingdom. Nowhere in the proposed Constitution Order 2008 is this ambition specified or referred to. Rather only the unspecific right to self-determination is mentioned which is a bit like including Mrs Beeton's Cookery Book but deciding never to do any cooking.

All time supporters of Falk-

land Island rights like myself, if they are to continue giving their unswerving and informed support, would perhaps like to be kept informed about just what manner of self-determination it is they are supporting. I do not personally support the continued dedication to 1960's institutional colonialism implied in the 2008 proposals. Others are free to do as they

As a now rather ancient Falkland Islander, I much appreciate the inclusion of a specification of who is and who is not entitled to Falkland Island Status in the Constitution and that this right is cascaded down the nominated generations. However, and please except my own passing interest as irrelevant, some of those specified and included and currently living abroad might have even appreciated being consulted or advised regarding the future constitutional path of events, given that they are constitutionally acknowledged as Falkland Islanders and perhaps being involved in some inclusive process.

Who knows, by such a process you may have just raised enough interest among some of the younger and more active ones for them to actually become physically involved.





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Out of my window

A column in which Inspector Len McGill of the Royal Falkland Islands Police takes an occasional look outside as the new prison and station renovations take shape...

perception reached out and touched my back It slowly, almost imperceptibly, found its way up my spine, jangling every nerve and muscle until it entered my head and brain, stopping only for a moment to raise the hair on the back of my neck. You are being watched! Don't be silly, you're on the first floor and there is no-one there, just 'my window.

I was greeted by a very broad. toothy smile when I finally gave way to my feelings and turned to look behind me. There, bobbing at the very bottom level of my window was a face I have grown used to seeing over the past months. A nod confirmed that this was not a passing visit. Having completed the first of the cells in the south west corner of the prison the scaffolding was moved and the block walls of the second cell began to grow. The smallest of the cells, it has a bevelled corner. This has required the accurate cutting of angles into many blocks by the Stihl saw wielding. block layer's mate. The walls steadily rose up toward me and a door way and small observation window became obvious, the latter giving away its intended use. This cell, centrally placed on the west wall, is the only cell without natural light or an outside wall. It will become the observation cell to be used only when



a prisoner has to be kept under constant watch.

Returning to the Police Station on foot mid afternoon one day last week. I was passing the site gates when I noticed that there was no obvious activity. I seized my chance. What was going on behind the east wall that I could no longer see from my window? I strode confidently up the narrow wheelbarrow plank into the main floor of the building. As I walked up to the newly constructed cells, I realised that it was not as big as it might first appear. Yet, as I walked around I found that I was becoming comfortable that so much was going to be achievable in this

space, due to a great deal of thought having gone into its layout. Its design will enable different combinations of male, female and juvenile prisoners to be handled, as prescribed by law, in well equipped and comfortable spaces. I wondered what someone like me would be thinking as they wandered through the building in 50 to 100 years time. How has the design held up to time and were we correct in providing such a minimal space in relation to expected prison population. I truly

I orientated myself and walked out through the door-way in the south wall. I dropped down onto compacted fill material which spanned the area between the retaining wall and the prison walls. This path lead to the old door way, opened up several weeks ago in the east wall of the exercise yard and was a clear demonstration of the design to allow access to this facility from the prison. I then ventured to look behind the east wall. I found a completed concrete path running along its entire length. The drain inspection pits were now up to their necks in concrete. With their lids fitted, they presented a smooth comfortable place to walk. I wonder what that step ladder was needed

The topping off of the walls was completed with the installation of the remaining window lintels. Much of the block work is now very visible to the passer by, both through the Ross Road site gates and from Pencil Lane. The north wall nears completion, showing the doorway from the gaoler's office and the observation window into the main circulation space. This stage of construction lead to a very puzzling behavioural change by several workmen on site. The individuals concerned could be observed peering down the small square spaces or voids in the hollow blocks used in the wall construction. Several stances are discernaible: There is the body flat up against the wall, head tilted to the left or right stance, the arm over the wall 'get friendly with the space' stance, but most curious of all the 'tool or stick users' stance, the latter first described by observers of our closest animal kingdom relatives. I wondered if the poking of thin metal rods into these spaces was the result of the world financial crisis declared by the President of the United States of America: perhaps they were looking for Lehman Brothers stocks or even stuffing their hard earned cash down them so that it does not disappear with the demise of the next bank, or had someone dropped the key to the tea break cabin? Alas, the answer turned out to be much more mundane. These voids were being filled with a concrete mix which had to be tamped down using the tools described above. The filled voids, once cured, will form a solid rod of concrete and add to the overall strength of the walls.

It's Monday 29 September 2008 and through my window I hear a new sound. There is the ringing of metal. It's not scaffolding, I have become able to recognise that sound, metal poles, like crystal glass, have a particularly pleasing note when dropped. It sounds much more substantial, flat and dull. I notice the gathering of three individuals within the walls of the south west cell. They appear anxious, shifty even and have a particular interest in the new metal delivered to site.

I am turning the tables on them this week, the watcher will become the watched.

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Wool market report

for September 26

THE Australian Wool market AWEX indicator fell this week by AUD 37 cents to 859 cents, the sharpest drop in 8 months. In fact the AWEX is only down 4p from £3.93 to £3.89

Wild fluctuations in all currency rates have disguised the trends in the wool market. The Australian dollar increased against the Pound.

Instability in the world economy and currency fluctuations are blamed for the drop in all wool markets (Aus, NZ, South Africa, Uruguay)

China is still the biggest buyer, with support from India and Europe

Pass in rates and withdrawal rates were higher due to the depressed market. The next few weeks will see big increases in the amount of wool being offered.

LIVING in the Falklands, one becomes accustomed to people not knowing where your island-home is. It then becomes strange to find yourself as the ignorant one and be asking others where exactly are the Wallis and Futuna Islands Mayotte, St Pierre and Michelon.

This is what happened to the Development Corporation's Dan Fowler when he travelled to St Pierre and Michelon in Newfoundland for a two week aquaculture workshop organised and funded by the Overseas Countries and Territories Association (OCTA). "As this was the first event of its kind, I'm not sure that anyone knew quite what to expect, but for my part, I thought it was a fantastic opportunity and experience," said Dan.

Aimed at bringing together members from OCTA with an interest in aquaculture, many producers and government types gathered for a series of lectures and discussions ranging in topic from the biology of aquaculture species, to the steps required to start-up and run a (hopefully successful) business and everything in be-tween. "Many lessons were learned, and I think everyone took something away with them," said Dan. Particularly important, he felt, was one of the recurring themes throughout: that the success of any prospective industry requires strong support from the government, the local community, and potential investors. Without all three in place, aquaculture will never be a success story. "We'll be bearing this in mind as we begin to look at taking aquaculture to the next level in the Falklands," he said.

In addition to the classroom theory, the group got out and about, visiting a scallop farm in Michelon in the early part of the visit and spending the last few days touring Newfoundland. They started with the Department of Fisheries and Aquaculture, moved on to the industry sites it supports and then made a visit to a fish processing plant. Dan described the visits as "a real eye-opener. The scale of these farms is impres-

sive, from a mussel farm with six million tonnes of mussels growing in the water (one of four sites the company owned) to the salmon farm that can get through 25 tonnes of fish feed every day."

Whilst it's clear the Falklands has a long way to go in the global scheme, Dan said it's very reassuring to know the Falklands are not the only ones trying to build an aquaculture industry against the odds that come with being on a remote island. "On top of this, some of these people are truly succeeding, creating employment opportunities and adding to their country's economy," he added.

As well as the lessons learned, the members that attended are now working on plans to create an association of aquaculture industry members from the overseas territories, with the purpose of jointly strengthening the position of aquaculture in the territories and sharing knowledge and experience.



New airbridge in action

FLYGLOBESPAN, the Scottish airline contracted to supply the airbridge to the UK, made its first flight into the Falklands last week and is now reported to have secured deals to lease up to four of its aircraft to airlines in Chile.

The deal is the latest move by FlyGlobespan to utilise its aircraft over the slower months as the industry faces increasing pressure from soaring fuel costs and the economic slowdown, reported *Times Online*.

"These leases are a very good means of generating income during what is traditionally a difficult time for the UK holiday trade," said Flyglobespan's owner Tom Dalrymple.

FlyGlobespan has responded vigorously in recent weeks to media reports that it might be the next airline to go under as rivals Zoom and XL have, insisting that it is in good shape and will return a profit next year.

One airbridge passenger commented that the inflight service was largely unchanged, adding that the airframes are old with the Air India logo visible under the paint work.

A business class passenger said he had travelled in comfort, although the flight had been three hours longer due to an extended stopover in Ascension and an additional hour on each leg of the journey.

Disappointed shearers return

THE Falklands shearers left Norway somewhat down hearted following the 13th Golden Shears Championships this week.

Jan Clarke and Lee Molkenbuhr travelled to the competition after qualifying in the Falklands earlier this year. Both men are top shearers, capable of remaining at the top of the board throughout the season and have claimed and broken shed records around the Islands.

Jan competed three years ago in Australia with fellow Islander Paul Phillips. Shearing fine merino sheep they achieved fifth place in the team shear and Jan was seventh overall in the individual competition.

This year Jan finished 17th and Lee 21st out of about 100 shearers from a record 28 countries, in what was the first time ever the championship was held in a non-English speaking country.

New Zealand dominated the competition, taking home four of the six titles up for grabs.

Speaking to Lee as he made his way to Cumbria in the UK on Wednesday, he said they were both, "very disappointed" with their final positions.

The sheep used for the competition were 'strong' woolled, unlike the finer breeds the men are accustomed to shearing. The first and second rounds were on Norwegian Whites and although they didn't do well in the first round they felt they had improved considerably in the second, said Lee. However, in the third round a native Norwegian sheep the Spael was introduced: "They're more like goats," he added.

The two men shared a proud

The two men shared a proud moment when they carried the Falklands flag at the opening and closing ceremonies for the event.

It's back to the Falklands for Jan and Lee on Monday, where the Golden Shears will fade into a distant memory as shearing in a contract gang gets underway.

There's plenty of time to sharpen the cutters and skills before 2010 however, when the top shearers from around the world will gather in Wales and no doubt the Falklands flag will proudly fly grain.

Tornado F3 flies south the easy way

AMIDST strong winds and occasional blizards, one of the largest aircraft in the world, an Antonov AN-124 Condor, landed at Mount Pleasant on Saturday, carrying three aircraft in its vast hold.

A Tornado F3 from RAF Leuchars in Scotland and two Lynx helicopters which have been specially modified for South Atlantic flying were packed inside the massive aircraft as it touched down at Mount Pleasant Airport.

This piggy-back arrangement was part of Operation Southern Cross, described by a Mount Pleasant spokesperson as a roulement of aircraft between RAF Leuchars and 1435 Flight at MPA, designed to avoid airframes stress issues.

A nine man team of Air Movements staff unloaded the three

aircraft and loaded an out-going Tornado, bound for Brize Norton, all within 24 hours of the Antonov's landing.

It's not as though it hasn't happened before and as sure as eggs are chickens it will happen again, so wringing hands in despair won't get us anywhere, it's simply a matter of dealing with it and hopefully having prepared for it.

Yes, you've rumbled me. A financial pundit I'm not, but I do believe having a firm grasp of the value of money and that it has to be worked for from a very early age, has stood me in good stead for the last three decades.

An extract from the 1908 FI Magazine and Church Paper landed on my desk this week, courtesy of our esteemed and now retired former financial secretary. Derek Howatt. A snippet caught my eye, which said that certain changes were in progress with reference to the Childrens' Penny Savings Bank, which "may have outgrown its usefulness."

I can safely say that the scheme lived on. Sixty-two years later I took a penny or two to school on a Monday morning. It was diligently marked down by the teacher and then deposited in my Government savings account. By the ripe old age of 13, I had saved £15 and it was with great reverence I went to the Treasury to withdraw a few pounds to buy my first pair of Levi jeans from the West Store. That summer I worked as messenger for the Secretariat in the school holidays and boosted the balance. I splashed out on a pair of chunky heeled shoes to keep my still too long jeans off the ground. The urge to empty the account entirely was resisted and there has always been enough in it for a few drizzly days ever since.

Now while this may bear little or no resemblance to the financial chaos erupting around the world, in my mind the same principle applies; it's just the figures that differ rather dramatically. On his retirement, when asked about the dramatic changes to his job in the 'boom time' which surrounded the introduction of the fishing zone around the Falklands in the mid 1980s, Derek Howard replied: "You just added a few more noughts on to the end of

the numbers.

Mr Howatt has also been heard to say that you simply don't spend what you haven't got. I like the principle; it's simple and it works. "Cut your coat according to your cloth." advised the editor of the FI Magazine 100 years ago, urging his readers. "Where there is a growing family it is an absolute duty to lay by something every year, in order to provide for contingencies and the rainy day that is sure to come." His final wise words on the subject were: "For age and want save while you may."

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Cllr Clausen responds to smoking letters

COUNCILLOR Clausen has taken the opportunity to respond to several issues that have been raised recently in the letters page about the pros and cons of smoking.

Recent letters have posed the questions as to whether or not passive smoking is harmful; it's been suggested that smoking might be beneficial to those who partake and further that the democratic process was not evident during the debate on this subject.

She said the Working Group's

She said the Working Group's remit, following a clarification of objectives from Executive Council, was to consider ways in which:

1) The workforce could be protected from the potentially harmful effects of being exposed to tobacco smoke in the workplace;

2) The general public could be protected from the potentially hamful effects of being exposed to tobacco smoke in enclosed public places:

3) The general public could be discouraged from smoking for general public health reasons.

The objectives were not just to look at ways to mitigate the harmful effects of passive smoking, but also smoking in general, Cllr Clausen said. "These objectives were arrived at not because there was clear evidence that passive smoking led to lung cancer, or that Professor Sir Richard Doll wasn't bothered by smoking, it was because the clinicians (the experts) and the people of the Falkland Islands were.

"The Chief Medical Officer had identified smoking as a significant threat to the health of the people of the Falkland Islands in 2000 and a strategy group completed a report in 2002, recommending actions on how to deal with the harmful effects of smoking in our community," Cllr Clausen said.

These included a ban on smoking in work places and enclosed public places, an education and advertising programme in particular supporting the DARE programme, an increase in the cost of smoking via tax, an increase in the legal age from 16 to 18 years and cessation support (free nicotine replacement

and support groups). More recently, in 2006, a Health Census was carried out by the Department of Health and Social Services, seeking the views of the public on a range of health issues, including smoking. The results from this survey, which had a 70% return rate, revealed that 77% of people felt that a ban on smoking in enclosed public places should be put in place. 89% and 97% of smokers completing the census felt that a ban on smoking at work and in enclosed public places would be effective ways of helping them to quit smoking, she explained.

"Whilst other methods of support such as cessation support, increasing the cost of smoking and education via advertising ,were also thought to be effective - in each case over 50% of smokers supported these prohibitions.

"The Working Group was not tasked with looking at the evidence for or against the harmful effects of either smoking or passive smoking. The Chief Medical Officer sat on the group to advise as appropriate and did not inform the group that smoking or passive smoking was safe to indulge in. I believe that the subject of evidence is for medical experts to advise upon and they duly did so. Suffice to say that medical studies and statistics are not foolproof and the incorrect application of sound statistical methods can and does take place. Nonetheless there is little doubt that the components of tobacco are potentially harmful.

"So, if we can agree that tobacco is really not a terribly nice substance, which has the ability to cause anyone indulging terrible harm, it is not a very big step to see that it is also harmful to all those around you when in an enclosed space, especially given that only 15% of the smoke generated from a cigarette stays with the smoker, the other 85% being expelled into the surrounding environment for everyone else to en-

Furthermore, extractor fans are not necessarily as effective as you would think; it is virtually impossible for them to remove all of the smoke in the environment and unless properly maintained they remove only the sight and smell of tobacco, leaving all the really good toxic stuff behind for you to in-

hale, she said.
"We could quote studies on both sides back and forth but some facts you just can't escape. Of course if tobacco is really so bad you might ask why we don't just ban it en-tirely. Well it is quite hard to reverse 500 years of addiction and frankly people will still use it, banned or otherwise. I personally think that it is every individual's right to harm themselves - so long as they don't harm or inconvenience others (in any way) - which is why I haven't supported the view that tobacco should be banned totally; it should be for an individual to decide.

As for democratic process, Cllr Clausen said she struggled to see how much more could have been done to make the subject more consultative or open to debate; the debate in the House was public, the Health Census was made available for all to complete, the Working Group was open to the public and whilst the Working Group and Executive Council have agreed a policy direction, the new laws required are still being drafted and so this subject will be again available for all to debate and lobby upon.

Democracy to me is allowing everyone in the community an opportunity to provide their opinions in an open and free manner. It is the role of the democratically elected members to listen to these views and those of advisors and then to make the decision which is the most appropriate. Granted, not always an easy task and we sometimes get it wrong, but so long as we always keep our minds open and listen to all views - and I believe this has been done in this case then we should arrive at the most acceptable conclusion."

Seeing is believing

THE fact that October 9, was World Sight Day may have escaped most people, but not Standard Chartered Bank (SCB), or its staff in Stanley.

To raise money for the bank's Seeing is Believing appeal and to raise her own awareness of what blindness might be like, bank employee. Bonita Goodwin, spent most of her day-off last week blindfolded.

For ten hours Bonita went about her normal routine, taking the kids to school, shopping in the West Store and the Bread Shop and finally walking home.

Apart from encounters with a lamp post and a skip, which she had forgotten about. Bonita said it was not as difficult as she had expected; people helped her to find what she needed in shops and with her other senses on high alert, the Bread Shop, was easy to locate. Not being able to see the television was a major deprivation.

So far SCB employees in the Falklands have raised £4,200, £385 of that coming from Bonita's efforts, described by Bank Manager, Rino Donosepoetro as, "a testament to the staff's commitment to the Seeing is Believing cause.

Standard Chartered Bank announced this week that Seeing is Believing will raise and invest USS 20 million to fund the development of sustainable eye care services for 20 million people in 20 cities across the world.

As a demonstration of its commitment to the programme, the Bank is to match every donation raised until the USS20 million target is met and aims to raise the funds by 2013.

Initiated in 2003 and driven by the Bank's employees, Seeing is Believing is helping tackle avoidable blindness, 90 per cent of which is found in the developing world where the Bank's business is rooted.

To further raise funds, donation boxes have been placed in a number of retail outlets and there are leaflets and donation forms available in the banking hall for people who wish to donate directly from the bank account to Seeing is Believing

This year, in partnership with the Infant and Junior School, Standard Chartered Bank is staging a competition for the students, who will be asked to draw or paint the scene the children would most miss seeing if they lost their sight, as a way of getting them to think about what life is like for blind children all around the world.

Freed from lethal collar

ALL those concerned people who have recently reported sightings of a young Sea Lion wearing a rubber collar to Falklands Conservation can now rest easy; he or she has been liberated.

While not in any apparent distress from this unusual fashion accessory, it was likely that within a few months, with further growth, the animal would have found the collar increasingly restrictive, with possibly fatal consequences.

After consulting Falklands Conservation and borrowing restraining equipment from the Veterinary Department, a small group of rescuers, led by Alastair Baylis of the Fisheries Department, headed down to the coastline between Gypsy Cove and Hadassa Bay, where the animal, thought to be one of last year's pups, had been spotted.

According to onlookers, after

locating the seal, Alistair, who studied fur seals in Australia for his PhD, managed to catch it, "calmly and confidently" and remove the collar - apparently some sort of piping gasket - leaving the animal none the worse for its experience.

Effort and catch limit recommendations

A PAPER setting out the limits on Total Allowable Effort (TAE) and Total Allowable Catch (TAC) for the 2009 calendar year was presented to the Fisheries Committee (FC) for information on Tuesday.

The paper, which does not address fee issues, covers all fisheries except for exploratory fisheries and the second *Loligo* season, which will be the subject of separate papers.

FC member, Mr Lewis Clifton, congratulated the Fisheries Depart-

ment on the paper, the first of its kind to be produced by them, independently of the Renewable Resources Assessment Group (RRAG) of Imperial College, London.

Commenting on the proposals, Director of Fisheries, John Barton, said that while there were some variations from previous years, the general intent of the proposals in the paper was to, "ensure the stability of the fisheries."

For Munn read Merron in new Cabinet

FOLLOWING the recent re-shuffle of Gordon Brown's cabinet, the post of Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, which brings with it responsibilities regarding the Falkland Islands and was previously held by Meg Munn, has now gone to Gillian Merron, MP for Lincoln.

Miss Merron, who is 49 and has been a member of the British Parliament since 1997, visited the Falklands in the late nineties, when she was Parliamentary Private Secretary to an MoD Minister.

Since 2006, she has occupied a

number of junior ministerial positions, most recently in the Department for International Development as Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State.

Court news

STANLEY woman Lyn Summers appeared in the Magistrate's Court on Wednesday to face a charge of drinking while on a Prohibition Order.

Ms Summers pleaded guilty to the offence and was given a six month conditional discharge and ordered to pay £35 prosecution costs.

Skate quota to be reviewed

A COMPLAINT from the Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association (FIFCA) about the quota for skate set by ExCo this year was among the topics discussed at Tuesday's meeting of the Fisheries Committee.

While the global quota fee for skate remained unchanged at £274,579, a reduction of total allowable effort (TAE) from 29.59 vessel units (VU) in 2007 to 22.7 VU in 2008, led, FIFCA claimed, to an effective 30% rise in the quota cost.

Replying to suggestions from FIFCA that ExCo had been unaware of the reduction in TAE, when they set the skate quota rates, the Director of Fisheries. John Barton, said that this was not the case, nor, was it the case, as also claimed by FIFCA, that advice from Imperial College's Renewable Resources Assessment Group, (RRAG) had been ignored.

In fact, Mr Barton told the meeting, the paper that went to ExCo from the Fisheries Department reflected RRAG's advice on both fees and the TAE.

Explaining the reason for the Fisheries Department's stance, the Director of Fisheries stated that the conservation target for the directed skate fishery was around 2.600 metric tonnes, but in 2007 the actual total skate catch had amounted to

3.513 metric tonnes, equivalent to an increase of 35%.

Mr Barton explained that the reduction in allowable effort was an attempt to bring catch levels in line with the conservation limit.

The process for setting fees and effort was the same that had been used in the skate fishery for a number of years, said Mr Barton, but would be changing as the Fisheries Department took over primary responsibility for advising government on fishing fees and effort from Imperial College.

Representing the Skate Group of the FIFCA, Hamish Wylie stated that his members were being "grossly overcharged," particularly as the quantity of skate caught as by-catch by unlicensed vessels now equalled 60% of that caught in the directed fishery.

Assuming no change in the behaviour of fin fish licensed vessels, the fact that they had seen such a big increase in skate by-catch suggested an abundance of the species, rather than the sort of decrease which might justify a reduction in TAE by the targeted fishery, said Mr Wylie.

The meeting decided to return the issue to ExCo with FIFCA's recommendation that the skate quota fees should be reduced.

Building capacity is the focus of human rights visit

FOR some people, the title 'Human Rights Coordinator for the South Atlantic and Pacific' might well conjure up the image of some sort of superior snooper, prying into every aspect of our society to sniff out examples of abuse. In the case of a visitor to the Islands this week, who bears that title, nothing could be further from the truth or from her intentions.

Rosanna Mesquita, a nonpracticing lawyer working for the Commonwealth Foundation, told Penguin News that the aim of the Foundation and its project partners: Commonwealth Legal Education Association and the Commonwealth Human Rights Initiative, is not to make recommendations or search out examples of human rights abuses in the nine Commonwealth countries involved in the project, but to deliver a range of activities which will assist its participants to better negotiate and deal with international human rights obligations.

These obligations may be found in the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR), the European Convention on Human Rights (ECHR) and the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination



against Women (CEDAW).

While in the Falklands, MsMesquita is meeting with the Governor, the Acting Attorney General, councillors, the police, the Senior Magistrate, justices of the peace, heads of government departments, faith-based organisations and others. The purpose of these meetings is to present the different project activities and to enquire if and how the different groups would like to take advantage of these activities.

Having just visited St Helena, where she was very happy to be stopped frequently on the streets of James Town, for chats with people, Ms Mesquita would be delighted to hear from people and to answer any questions people might have about the project.

Flexible *Illex* proposal decision deferred by FIFCA

A DECISION by the Fisheries Committee on an Exco suggestion aimed at giving more flexibility of operation to local trawler owners, was deferred, pending further consultation and information regarding its legal aspects, at Tuesday's meeting.

The suggestion, which had been "floated" at ExCo during a debate on Illex licence fees, (see last week's PN) was that Falkland Islands registered trawlers might be able to pursue Illex for periods less than the usual four month licensing period, paying fees on a pro rata ba-

sis

Interest had been shown in trawling for Illex using the 'Illex only' licence type as opposed to the 'Restricted Finfish and Illex' type, by some local companies, due to the overlap with the Loligo fishery, where most Falkland Islands registered vessels operate, coupled with the recent significant reduction in fishing time, during the Loligo first season.

Arguments in favour of the proposal outlined by the Fisheries Department related to the extra flexibility in fishing operations

that such an arrangement would potentially provide for Falkland Islands trawlers. Unlike foreign vessels, these had few options to fish in other areas of the world.

However, the fact that inclusion would depend on the flag of the vessel could be perceived as being both discriminatory, including against Falkland Islands companies involved with foreign trawlers or jiggers and at odds with the Individual Transferable Quota system (ITQ), which was not yet applied to the *Illex* fishery.

West Point trip a winner with visiting travel reps

REPRESENTATIVES of four leading remote destinations travel companies recently spent an FITB hosted week in the Falklands.

Chosen in consultation with local agencies, ITT and Falkland Islands Holidays, UK-based companies Cox & Kings, Journey Latin America and Steppes Travel, plus Italian company, Palagonia Travel, beat off stiff competition to be awarded a place on this lamiliarisation trip, one of several planned by FITB for the 2008/9 season

Selection was based on the number of visitors previously sent to the Falklands, as well as willingness to feature the Islands in future promotional materials.

Flying in on the LAN route, agents visited eight key destinations as part of a whirlwind itinerary designed to provide them with a greater understanding of the land-based tourism offering and associated logistics. "The ultimate aim of these coordinated visits is to increase land-based visitor numbers to the Islands - and these trips are an economical way to broaden distribution channels and raise awareness for a destination of our size," commented FITB's Liz Dimmlich.

Each of the agents was given the opportunity to reveal his favourite experience of the trip, as well as any operational issues that could affect a visitor's stay in the Islands. GM FITB Jake Downing noted that feedback for operators and destinations was generally highly complimentary, with each of the agents citing the day trip to West Point Island on board Michael Clarke's Condor as "an unforgetable experience."

How the other half live: Mental health in Whitby and Stanley



KAREN Rimicans and Kevin Ryder have bridged a distance of some 8.000 miles to work for World Mental Health Day

Kevin is the Community Mental Health Team manager in Whitby, North Yorkshire, Stanley's twinned town, while Karen is the local Senfor Community Psychiatric Nurse.

Kevin follows happenings in the Falklands and got in touch with Team Tranquil, the Mental Health Strategy Group, after reading their latest online news update.

As this year's World Mental Health Day 2008, (October I) drew near Kevin and Karen tried a joint venture between the two localities. Kevin said, "Whitby is twinned with Stanley and this can get overlooked as people often think that it has to be grand things that get shared, however it should be about people sharing the every day experiences of normal life such as education, fish-

ing, healthcare and football."
With support from their respective communities they have looked at what promotes good mental health in both Whitby and Stanley.

In Stanley, both the Infant and Junior School (IJS) and the Falkland Islands Community School (FICS) have been involved in the project with some fantastic results, said Karen.

Displays featuring Falklands and Whitby images together with messages about what they signify for different people in each twin town will soon be on show around Stanley and Whitby. "Some images are fun while others are a bit more thought provoking," Karen said.

Whitby like Stanley, depends on local people getting involved in supporting their own community with many people having dual roles. Kevin has worked in Whitby for about 22 years and lived near Whitby with his family for more than 25 years. As well as being a mental health nurse with almost 30 years experience, Kevin has worked as a Coast Guard in the small fishing village of Staithes, which is part of the Whitby Sector, for 14 years.

He has always had an interest in all things maritime and all things polar: "I was born about a mile from where Captain James Cook was born and have read all about his travels and those with James Clark Ross, Ernest Shackleton and Robert Falcon Scott to name a few," he explained. Karen added that she was sure Kevin would enjoy our own John Smith's lectures and learning more about some of the Falkland Islands own rich nautical history.

Kevin is also a keen marathon runner, having completed over 20 full marathons in his time, however finding the time to train let alone race can be difficult, he commented. "The internet can make life easier, especially things like linking up with Stanley, but unfortunately as the internet age came along so did working harder just to stand still.

"Life is certainly more stressful now than it has been in the past. and in any rural idyll whether that is Stanley or Whitby the quiet life is a lifestyle to make, rather than just find by being there.

The Falkland Islands are in the process of developing a mental health service and community support for local people, so gaining an insight into a more established tocality like Whitby might be useful, explained Karen, adding that although the two communities are over 8,000 miles apart, they share a lot of common features.

The population of the Whitby area and catchment locality for the Community Mental Health Team is about 28,000 - 30,000, in comparison to the Falkland Islands 3,000 population. Roughly half the population live in town, while the other half live in scattered villages across the North Yorkshire Moors. Kevin said that providing a mental health service in rural locations and outlying farms in his area can be a challenge: "Sometimes in Whitby, similar to the Falkland Islands, staff may only have time to make a small number of home vis-

its per day due to the weather conditions or the distance from base to the patient's home. In extreme winter conditions many of these villages are cut off from services.

Team Tranquil, Kevin and all those who have participated in the health promotion project in Whitby and in the Falkland Islands hope that people will enjoy the display.

'Hopefully it will encourage people to give more thought about how they look after their own mental health, by finding out what matters to you and discovering ways to promote good mental health in our own lives and in our own communities, concluded Karen.

Swedish tour group with a difference

LEAVING the Falkland Islands on Saturday was a tourist group with several differences.

For a start, at nineteen strong, they were a large group by Falk-lands standards. They were also mostly above average height, which might be something to do with the fact that they were from Sweden, in itself unusual for Falklands' visitors, or because the majority were ex-military men, including at least two retired colonels.

One of the group's leaders, publisher and journalist. Jimmy Olsson, from Malmo, explained to Penguin News that the group, from all over Sweden, were clients of a specialist battlefield company called Pelle Mohlin Travel.

On returing from the Swedish army with the rank of Colonel some five or six years ago, the company's owner decided he needed to find something to do and organised a battlefield tour to France for a group of fellow military buffs.

Since then, with the breakdown of the Soviet Union and the opening of frontiers between East and West making many more battlefields available to visit, the company has gone from strength to strength, building a predominantly

male client base, distinguished, said Jimmy Olsson, by the understanding nature of their wives.

According to Jimmy, the last time that Sweden fought a war was in 1810, "when we were los-ing Finland" and it is a little odd that with so many battlefields on their door steps. Swedish military buffs should choose to come to the Falklands, prompted, it seems, by a chance viewing of an old newsreel, rather than any salemanship on our part.

What is good, however, is that after ten days in the Falklands, staying at Darwin House, Pebble Island Lodge and the Malvina House Hotel, doing battlefield tours with local guides, the group's leaders are already talking about a renum visit in 2010.

Argentina's major blooper

ARGENTINA'S Ministry of Defence (MoD), has put a temporary end to the sovereignty dispute with a major blooper in their official publication.

The September edition of the Revista de Defensa, (Defence Magazine) has a long article under the heading, "The Armed Forces mission in today's Argentina" illustrated with an official map of Argentina with the Falkland Islands and Port Stanley clearly marked.

What makes it even more embarrassing, according to the Buenos Aires press, is that the magazine and its contents, particularly in such a sensitive area for the administration of President Cristina Fernandez de Kirchner, are under the direct supervision and responsibility of Minister Nilda Garré, one of the president's most trusted officials.

Ms Garré actually sponsored the magazine and did the launching of the first edition in August and it was distributed in September. There is to be a second edition of the magazine where the Falklands will again become the Malvinas.

Why has the large monopoly continued to fail?

3. There is a clear need to look at improved diversification of the business including shedding some of the under-utilised land so that others can at least attempt to do what clearly Landholdings have failed to do.

It is a disgrace that FLH which could arguably be the farming flagship, has not been able to manage its affairs better. Small farmers should be congratulated on their will to diversify and sustain their business without in many cases any form of help from FIG.

Law covers all dogs in the Islands

How can FIG justify the huge difference between these wage earners who clearly have the same living expenses?


As I have often said in the past increasing prices on a percentage basis is very risky and eventually leads to huge financial losses to the provider.

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
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
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Graham Bound visits Gibraltar to find a 57 year relationship with a special family still going strong

GIBRALTARIANS have been taking their fight to the United Nations again this week, and good luck to their leader Peter Caruana and the opposition leader Joe Bossano, who have teamed up to sock it to the General Assembly.

The 30,000 or so folk who live on The Rock deserve to be left alone to get on with their lives free of the tedious drip-drip-drip of aggressive Spanish diplomacy.

But why am I blowing the Gib trumpet so energetically this week? Well, it's personal and rather emotional. I have, you see, just returned from a weekend on The Rock, and so rich and rewarding was my experience there that Gibraltarians – and one local family in particular – have my total loyalty.

Let me fill you in on the backstory of my trip to the only remnant of the empire that can match the Falklands for sheer bloodyminded loyalty. It goes like this, 57 years ago, my father, who then worked in the Falklands Treasury, was seconded to the Gibraltar Government for a few months. He had just married my mother, so they combined the secondment with a honeymoon. Fresh and eager, they arrived on The Rock after a train journey across Franco's impoverished post-civil war Spain. They found lodgings in a hotel that was just within their means, but which turned out to be a brothel. They swiftly moved into a Gibraltar Government quarter, "a little cottage surrounded by roses," as mum happily recalled it, and they loved it.

Soon they had formed a deep friendship with a fellow Treasury civil servant, Albert Gareze, a member of an old Gibraltarian family which had originated from Italy. Albert and his wife had a little boy, also called Albert, who took to mum and dad as if they were his uncle and aunt. All summer they enjoyed the joys of Gib. sometimes travelling to Tangiers for shopping and picnicking on the Spanish side of the border.

The secondment had to end, but the friendship did not. The families kept in touch as well as they could over 8,000 miles, without the benefit of email, telephone or even (for much of the time) air mail. In 1961 they met again, this time in London, and that short reunion revived the relationship for another few decades. Contact became sporadic, of course - that is often the way it happens - but the friendship survived. Unfortunately, dad never did return to Gib; he died in 1985. Then, a few years ago. Albert senior died and more recently Mrs Gareze passed away.

That might have been the end of the story, except that Albert's daughter Marilyn found my parents' address among her father's papers, and she wrote to Mum telling her the news. It was sad, of course, but the happier outcome

was that the relationship between our families was revitalised. Albert junior began exchanging emails with my mother, and finally, last weekend, mum, her friend Bill, my wife Nadia and I, set off for Gib.

We arrived at the Rock Hotel to find Albert Junior and his younger brother Jerry waiting for us. I instantly knew why that friendship had been forged in 1951, and why it had lasted. The two "boys", Jerry a maths teacher approaching retirement and Albert a civil servant several years into happy retirement, greeted us with warmth and openness of the kind

I have rarely seen before. At dinner that night, we met their wives. Christine and Margaret, and the sons and daughters who still live on The Rock. It was an evening which I will not forget. If Mr and Mrs Gareze were anything like their children – and Mum said they were very alike – it explained a lot.

I learned that Albert junior spent much of his adult life as a part-time TA sergeant commanding a huge 9.3 inch artillery piece. Defending the territory against the Spanish threat was serious work, so Albert is no softy. But he revealed a delightfully emotional side when he recalled his childhood relationship with my parents. "I was so young that I could not remember much about your mum and dad, he said. "But when they left, I knew I missed them very much.

"When we met in London years later, my dad did not tell me who we were going to meet – perhaps he thought I would have forgotten them. But I hadn't, and I was so happy. Later, I always felt that your mum was my missing aunt."

The next day, Albert showed us around his beloved Gib. We visited all the tourist sites, and when we approached the ticket booths for admission to the tunnels that riddle The Rock, to the Moorish Castle or to St Michael's Cave, Albert always went ahead for a chat with those who controlled admission. He would beckon us on happily and we entered free of charge. "I just tell them you are family visiting from the Falklands," he explained. "Those two words, 'family' and 'Falklands', mean a lot here."

The only significant point that we did not reach was the fortification high on The Rock from where Albert directed his gun. After hundreds of years, peace has broken out and the gun now sits forlorn and forgotten. These days the front line is at the UN. But, for years Albert and his crew were a real deterrent. Once they very nearly caused a diplomatic incident when the gun was accidentally left to track a Spanish ship as it passed through the straits. The spooked capitan reported the "aggression" to the authorities.

But we will get to see Albert's artillery. Because now that our families are firmly back in touch more visits are assured. Albert and I agreed that as he had always considered my mother his lost aunt, we had to be lost cousins. That suits me just fine. How wonderful it is to have family on The Rock.

I've stood in front of a cattle crush enticing them up the race and then slammed the gates shut on their necks while the husband 'estimated' the length of the lasso they were attached too. When you're eyeball to eyeball with one of those hairy beasts the adrenalin fairly pumps through!

3. It's a celebrity beer call. Where is it and who would you invite? Billy Bob's in Texas with David Beckham, Dawn French, Robbie Williams, Michelle Jones and Stefen before he turns 21. I would get a real kick out of ask-



ing him what he wanted to drink, Coke or lemonade?

4. What job would you most like to do? I'm doing it - although I would also very much like to be David Beckham's masseuse.

5. Who would you make Governor of the Falkland Islands? Tubby Smith like pal.

6. What are your distinguishing qualities? Patience. You have to have lots of it to be Arthur's wife.

7. If you could change something about the Falklands what would it be? Nothing - there again. I would like Conservation to admit they have made a dreadful mistake, that there are actually too many red neck turkies, farmers can cull them at will and a bounty will be paid for each beak!

The Guild of Spinners and Weavers - spinning yarns for 60 years

By Margo Smallwood ON the afternoon of October 8. 1948, 16 ladies met at Stanley House to form the Guild of Weavers, Spin-

ners and Dyers. The minutes noted that, "The aim of the Guild is to provide an open association for the study and practice of spinning, weaving and dyeing in the Falkland Islands." An annual membership subscription was set at "two-shillings and six-pence"

The new Guild had secured the loan from the Agriculture Department of six spinning wheels, a loom and various accessories to get started. These were initially shared between members' homes as the Guild had no premises where regular meetings could be held.

By the end of its first year, the Guild had 81 members Island-wide. was meeting monthly in the schoolroom of the Tabernacle and had orders to supply knitwear for the Falkland Islands Dependencies Survey (later to become the British Antarctic Survey)

The Guild soon moved to the old Gymnasium and held regular classes for children as well as teaching new members as they joined. While members were not obligated to help fill orders - many joined to learn to spin and to participate socially - the Guild continued to take orders for spinning and knitting with potential opportunities expanding in the later 1960s as tourists began to visit the Islands. Payment for these orders presumably went to the members who filled them, as records indicate the Guild itself had to hold fundraisers to keep afloat.

Major changes began for the Guild from the early 1970s. Falk-

land Islands Home Industries took over the promotion of the cottage industry side of spinning, knitting and other crafts. The Guild continued its educational role and its social role provided wives, who accompanied their husbands constructing Stanley Airport, a way to join in one aspect of Island life. Kit spinning wheels from Ashford in New Zealand were imported for the first time completely replacing wheels formerly imported from Norway and England by the early 1980s, due to losses during the Falklands War. Regular spinning classes were another war casualty and have only been held sporadically since.

The Guild began assisting the expansion into more textile skills by lending its space to Islander Cora Toase who first returned to provide tuition in weaving during the summer of 1983-84. She and her husband, Aidan, returned for many summers when Aidan built many new weavers their looms.

Felting started to become a major craft in its own right in the late 1990s, and it was the workshop format used by felter and weaver Angela Houston that not only introduced many Guild members to felting, but also to workshops as a fun and 'compact' way to share new skills. Workshops using the facilities at the Community School helped us overcome some of the space and water limitations of the Guild's Portakabin home.

Change continued in the new century. The Guild began regular dye workshops, particularly initiated by Rosemary Wilkinson who had also played an important part in the growing use of wool 'top' for

spinning. Top, wool which has been washed and combed in a wool mill, is now the preferred medium for

develop as one spins. Sixty years on, the Guild is still a going concern due to the dedication of Islanders, spinners and their husbands through the thin years as well as the busy ones. Most members now are working women - and occasionally men – for whom spinning and related crafts are relaxation rather than a means of making some extra money for the family; the Guild provides companionship while sharing interests and improving skills.

More spinning tales?

WITH sheep long being a part of Falklands agriculture and wool the major land industry since the 1880s, spinning and wool crafts in the Islands are older and broader than the Guild itself.

In fact, Gerald Roberts writing for the Dictionary of Falklands Biography, remembers his mother A. Marjorie Roberts, founding the Guild in the 1920s. Meeting minutes and broadcast scripts, however, make only one reference to what may have come before our current Guild.

Reporting on the unexpectedly high cost of spinning wheels imported in 1949, Mrs Roberts said: "When we imported the ones we got many years ago we were able to buy them cheap by getting them from Norway at a very reasonable rate of exchange. A Whaling ship kindly brought them down freight free."

Perhaps earlier spinners formed the nucleus of the Guild started in 1948? And what about spinners, weavers, rug-makers and knitters outside the Guild?

Planning and building update

THIS month's meeting was chaired by Councillor Richard Stevens with one of the first items to be reported upon, the decision by Executive Council (ExCo), to approve government's application in principle for the development of up to twelve dwellings on land at the Leading Lights site in East Stanley.

Of the nine new applications for planning permission no less than four were outline submissions seeking permission in principle. The first was for housing development at the site of the 'Old Butchery' on Moody Brook Road proposed by the Falkland Islands Company Limited (FIC) and the committee accepted the recommendation that it be refused for reasons which included a need for an overall development plan for the area, the need for the means of disposal of foul drainage to be addressed, and the need for a commitment to upgrade Moody Brook Road before such development can be approved.

Members were informed that ExCo had said there are no current proposals to either improve the road or provide sewerage treatment works. In locational terms, its preference is to encourage residential development between Dairy Paddock Road and Sapper Hill (where outline approval was granted to the FIC last February for up to 350 dwellings) rather than along Moody

Brook Road. It was understood that a detailed application for the first phase of the development, of between 30 and 40 dwellings, is likely before the end of the year.

Also refused was an outline application for residential development of up to twelve houses submitted by Jacqueline Cotter on land at the Moody Brook Homestead on Moody Brook Road. The current condition of the road was, again, one of the reasons for refusal and it was also felt that, with the proposed site isolated from the town, other sites on the road which were closer should be developed first.

The FIC also applied for permission in principle for the erection of a dwelling on land at Beaver Road to the west of Painswick House'. Conditional permission was granted with one of the conditions aimed at ensuring the surface water course located along the western boundary continues to function to facilitate such drainage of the plot and the surrounding area.

The fourth such application to be considered was submitted by Michael McRae (Jnr) for a dwelling on land at the rear of 2A H Jones Road with access off the adjacent road. Narrows View. Conditional outline planning permission was granted for this development

The following applications for

detailed planning permission were also granted conditional consent: a shelter at The Jetty Centre on Philomel Street for the Falkland Islands Tourist Board: Barry Neilson's proposal to erect a polytunnel at Stanley Cottage on Ross Road (it was here explained that, whilst the structure would be more than ten metres from a house not in the same curtilage and did meet other conditions, it had a floor area in excess of 25 square meters and was not therefore "permitted development" and needed such consent); a conservatory to replace the front porch of his dwelling at 10 Endurance Avenue for Steve Vincent: and the replacement and extension of the jetty at Albermarle Harbour on West Falkland for Trant Construction Limited (this latter received only temporary consent as it was to be formed from materials unsuitable for use as a permanent

Just one application was deferred – that for the erection of a small store with wash facilities and a bedsit for visiting yachtsmen to be located at The Boathouse on Ross Road for South Atlantic Marine Services Limited. There was concern over both the design and, particularly, the proposed siting and these and other matters are to be raised with the applicant to allow further discussion at the next meeting.

The committee then took note of a list of nineteen applications for a building permit and that further information was awaited on eleven of these, also that one (the shelter at The Jetty Centre) was exempt from such need.

Members were asked to endorse a report by the Environmental Planning Officer - EPO -(Antony Payne) which was the Appeal Statement prepared in respect of the committee's refusal last June to grant consent for two dwellings at Mink Park on Moody Brook Road. The report, which was endorsed, is now to be forwarded to ExCo who are to consider the appeal. Attached to the report was a copy of the written representation by the appellants, the content of which was also noted by the committee.

Last on the agenda was the arrangement for site visits to the Port Harriet Missile Testing Range. This followed an application for planning permission which was considered at the meeting held last July, when such consent was granted on a one-off basis only for rapier and high velocity missiles to be fired during a missile training exercise on dates to be agreed with the EPO. Visits by members and officers are now scheduled for October 27, and November 3.

The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday November 6.

Shaping a new relationship between the EU and OCTs

SINCE the entry into force of the Treaty of Rome of 1957, the Overseas Countries and Territories (OCTs) related to a Member State have been associated with the EU in order to promote their economic and social development and to establish close economic relations between the OCTs and the EU as a whole.

In the meantime most of the original OCTs have become independent countries, mostly ACP States, hardly comparable to the 21 OCTs associated with the EU today. Despite this historical evolution, the present logic applied to the cooperation between the EU and the OCTs is still inspired by similar principles applied to the cooperation between the EU and the ACP States. And in here lays the main problem facing the OCT-EU relations of today, because such a parallelism does not correspond to the reality in the field when looking at the specific social, economic and environmental challenges faced by the OCTs, neither the close historical, institutional and political ties between the OCTs and the EU. In fact, these territories are substantially "pieces of Europe".

Furthermore, it does not take into account the potential of OCTs as strategically important outposts, spread all over the world, as proponents of the EU's values and the fact that all OCT citizens are in principle also European citizens. In other words, even though we are far apart geographically, we are still part of the same European family, and we now have to strike a new and more adequate balance based on this reality.

Against this background, the European Commission adopted on June 25 2008, a Green paper intended to stimulate an open debate on the future relationship between the EU and the OCTs. The underlying rationale behind it is to strengthen the close links between the OCTs and the EU, and develop a partnership that can do more, not less, for the EU-OCT association.

There are however, no precooked answers but we have to do better, and the Green Paper will give room for collective thinking that can bring us closer to a common objective. The Green Paper poses a number of questions in particular on the rationale and nature of the OCT-EU association, but it is clear that its underlying objective is to kick-start a discussion on

how to lift the OCTs out of the traditional development cooperation approach that is applied to them today. The idea is to replace this by a new strategy, taking better account of the OCTs' specific status, their close link with the EU, their particular characteristics and to focus on enhancing the OCTs' competitiveness, and reducing their vulnerability.

To the outside world, the OCTs seem to have many common characteristics (such as narrow economies, biodiversity richness, ...), but in reality, huge dif-ferences between the OCTs exist in terms of relative richness, geographical character and location, remoteness, climate, natural resources or capacity to diversify their economies. Nevertheless, the current association between the EU and the OCTs is based on a common set of standards, treating all OCTs in the same way. It is therefore essential that a new partnership take better account of the specific characteristics of the individual OCTs, without increasing the administrative burden for the OCTs and the Commission.

Another pivotal area to address is the OCTs' vulnerability. Not only because the OCTs all suffer from narrow markets that prevent them from reaching economies of scale, but also be-

cause of their insular characteristics they are highly exposed to natural disasters (climatic, seismic and volcanic risks as well as tsunamis) whose frequency and force increase with global warming. Against this background, it is vital that a future relationship takes into account how the association between the EU and the OCTs can increase the OCTs' resilience towards such vulnerability.

Within the limits of the EC Treaty, there is a very large room for manoeuvre to modernise relations between the EU and the OCTs. It is not a simple task, and it will take time and effort to accomplish it. But with a cooperative spirit in the OCTs, the EU and the related Member States, it can be done. In order to gather as many views as possible, the public consultation on the Green Paper has commenced. Moreover, a Conference in Brussels on October 3, will gather stakeholders and interested parties from all sides to discuss the Green Paper. I hereby invite everybody to join us in shaping a new relationship between the EU and

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

New Haven in operation

JUST over a year from when construction started, Concordia Bay has berthed at the new ferry terminal at New Haven.

A project that has been the subject of much discussion and has had its share of technical difficulties along the way, the terminal is now in operation providing an all-weather berth and base for the East West ferry serv-

Workboat Services (WBS) Manager, Adam Cockwell, said the terminal "works fine" and the Captain and crew of the vessel are happy with the set up.

Surveys of the approach to the terminal were carried out last week and preliminary charts were given to WBS for approval. Concordia Bay made its first visit to the terminal on Saturday and has been operating from there for the rest of the week.

Customers of the service will see immediate benefits with no restriction on the length of vehicle that can be carried and more flexibility in the service because visits to Stanley will be less frequent, said Mr Cockwell.

Heavy machinery has already been shifted from West Falkland, with a tracked vehicle being landed on the breakwater, rather than the newly laid concrete ramps, to prevent damage.

Dunnage, in the form of a load of old tyres, has since been put on site for future use, confirmed Road Engineer Bob Hancox.

A formal opening ceremony is planned for November 8.

Funding for Stanley Dairy dries up

AT a special meeting on Monday the Falkland Islands Development Corporation Board (FIDC) decided to cease its support for Stanley Dairy.

The Board assessed a detailed plan for the business prepared by the Dairy's managers, Kevin and Leone Reynolds and FIDC staff.

The plan proposed further Government grant funding and FIDC loan funding in order to support the Dairy over the next few years before it could become profitable.

However, the Board agreed unanimously that there were too many risks to the business plan to provide a sound enough case for further funding.

"It felt that the risks outweighed the potential benefits given that just about 10% of the Stanley population currently take

milk from the Dairy and that a recent survey showed that most people were content with cheaper UHT mile from Chile," said the Government Chief Executive, Tim Thorogood.

The Board's decision needs to be reviewed by Executive Council (ExCo) before it becomes final. Although Exco is not scheduled to meet until November 13, an earlier meeting may be arranged in order to avoid a long period of uncertainty

FIDC Board Chairman, Councillor Richard Cockwell said: "It is very sad that the Board has been forced to conclude that there is not a viable future for the Dairy.

"The Dairy managers and staff have made superb efforts to modernise production and build the business, but at the end of the day the risks and costs in ensuring a

quality milk supply were too great compared to the limited market demand that seems to exist locally for fresh milk.

If Exco confirm this decision, the General Manager will work with staff to find a commercial buyer for the Dairy or if not look to dispose of the assets at best consideration. FIDC has no intention of providing any further financial support.

Including the purchase price, the cost of modernisation and capital, £650,000 of funding has been allocated to Stanley Dairy in

recent years.

Penguin News contacted Dairy Manager, Kevin Reynolds, on Thursday morning, however at that time he was unaware of the press release from the Board and preferred not to comment on what his plans for the future were.

Oil salvage team arrives

THE Korean fishing vessel, Tasmui, arrived in Port William on Wednesday carrying a salvage team which will attempt to extract the remaining oil from the sunken trawler, Ocean 8 in Berkeley Sound.

Director of Fisheries, John Barton, told Penguin News that he imagined that the team, from a company called Oriental Underwater Development, contracted by the Ocean 8's insurers, would begin work as soon as possible after they had had talks with the relevant authorities in the Islands and obtained whatever permits might be necessary.

According to Mr Barton, the team claimed to have identified in some detail where all the oil in the vessel was being carried at the time of the sinking, including relatively small amounts of engine and other lubricants. He supposed that in the majority of cases the operation would involve drilling from the outside, pumping out and then re-sealing the hull.

The Director of Fisheries says that the operation is expected to take around a month to complete and is likely to be quite complex: the burnt-out vessel is lying in thirty metres of water and the oil is distributed among quite a high number of tanks. Some of the oil is intermediate fuel oil (IFO), which is harder to remove than the lighter marine gas oil.

Mr Barton said that the company had a "significant record" of removing oil from distressed vessels, both heavier oils and marine gas oil.

The Tasnui was known to be carrying some equipment to assist in cleaning up any oil spilled, he said, but added that it was probably, "a bit

In their early talks with the salvage team, the Fisheries Department would be stressing the concentrations of wild life found in and around Berkeley Sound and the care that would have to be taken to ensure that no pollution arose as a result of their activities.



For myself, one such moment of revelation that the Falkland Islands was a different and better place, came many years ago, during my first Camp trip on a motor bike. Nowadays you can drive along the road from Goose Green to North Arm in no time, but back then, with no road, a BSA Bushman of uncertain temperament and very little idea of the way, it was a bit of an adventure and I was very relieved when at last I arrived at the Sound House; if I still had some way to go, I was at least sure of being on the

right track.

Albert and Linda Phillips were the occupants of the Sound House at the time and I had never met them before in my life, but they came out to greet me and invited me in to the kitchen, where they were just about to sit down to a classic Camp lunch of roast mutton, with fresh garden vegetables, gravy and mint sauce. In the Britain I had recently left, the arrival of an unexpected additional person at a meal time, would have caused most house wives to panic. Feeling just a bit embarrassed, I was about to make my excuses and leave, when a quick head count of those present: Linda, Albert, brother David, daughters Arlene and Lindsay, revealed that there was already an extra place set at the table and it was for me.

Of course this was the early seventies. In those days before television or even all-day radio, such hospitality was taken for granted in the Camp, where visitors were few, mutton was free and strangers were valued for their entertainment potential. Although we probably didn't yet know it, the Falklands were approaching the end of an era, when, according to the late Danny Cronin, as quoted in the Dictionary of Falklands Biography, a Falkland Islander was defined by his ability, "to ride a horse, to shear a sheep, to

plait a lasso and to sail a boat."

Although time has rendered this definition obsolete, I do believe that the peculiar historical, geographical and political circumstances of the Falkland Islands have produced a people, who are distinctly different and more than the sum of their original parts, be they British, European, Scandinavian,

St Helenian or South American.

We have chosen to be and to remain, British. However, if our claim to self-determination is to be universally accepted, we need to celebrate not only our Britishness, but also those positive differences, which separate our way of life from those of other countries, including Britain. We have the "determination", but do we know what we mean by the "self"? Your literary efforts may help us grope towards that definition.



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New look for SSA race meeting

Britain stands firm on Falklands sovereignty at UN

THE closing session of the United Nations General Assembly's Fourth Committee saw conflicting opinions about the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands exchanged between the British and Cuban representatives last Friday.

The Cuban delegate reiterated Cuba's support for what he called Argentina's "legitimate right" in the dispute over the Malvinas/Falkland Islands which, he said, were "part of the national territory of the brotherly Latin American country."

The representative of the United Kingdom took the floor to exercise the right of reply to Cuba's statement. He said his Government's position on the Falkland Islands was well known and had been reiterated in many recent statements. The United Kingdom had no doubt about its sovereignty over the Falkland Islands. Further, there could be no negotiations on that issue until and at such time as the people of the Islands so wished.

In calling for a fair and negotiated solution to the dispute in the shortest time possible, the Cuban delegate said that such a solution should take into account the territorial integrity of Argentina, "...as well as the wishes of the people inhabiting those islands."

Falkland Islands Councillor, Richard Cockwell, told Penguin News that he was pleased to see a reference to the Islanders' wishes. This was a departure from the usual hard line taken by the Kirschner administrations in Argentina, which have regarded the sovereignty dispute as a bi-partite affair between Britain and Argentina and have refused to allow that the wishes of the Islanders should be considered.

However, said Cllr Cockwell, he and his colleagues on the eightstrong elected Legislative Council of the Falkland Islands, would have preferred to see such a declaration coming at the beginning of the Cuban statement rather than at the end.

"From both the British and Falkland Islands point of view, the wishes of the islanders are paramount," he added. PN/MP



Dirty Cathedral clock still "a real treat" for Darren

IN Stanley this week, en route to South Georgia, were Elsa Davidson and Darren Cox.

Elsa is returning to South Georgia for her second season as curator at the South Georgia Museum in Grytviken, accompanied this year by her partner Darren, who until recently was Assistant Curator of Clocks, Watches and Scientific Instruments at the National Museum of Scotland.

Catching wind of the arrival of an expert horologist in the Islands, the Cathedral Council made contact with Darren to ask him to take a look at the Cathedral clock, which had been stopped for some time now.

On Wednesday morning, while Elsa waited at the foot of the ladder, Darren ascended the Cathedral tower to inspect the clock, made by JW Benson of London in 1904 and presented to the Cathedral by Mrs Orissa Dean, to commemorate the life of her husband, George Markham Dean.

Darren has worked on a JW Benson clock before and described the opportunity to see the cathedral clock as "a real treat," but his prognosis was not encouraging for anyone hoping to hear the clock chiming the hours and quarters, as it once did, any time soon.

Darren will be preparing a detailed report for the Cathedral Council, probably during the sea voyage to South Georgia, but told Penguin News that he would be recommending that no one should attempt to get the clock going again until it had received a, "serious clean."

Accumulations of dirt, dust and metal over the years have combined with lubricating oil to form a kind of grinding paste. Even if the clock could be forced into action, the result would be increased and finally, fatal, wear, Darren claims.

More serious was the state of the clock's chiming mechanism, which needs partial replacement.

Global giant on 'getting to know you' visit

REPRESENTATIVES of global exploration giant, BHP Billiton, were in Stanley last week laying the groundwork for a Southern Ocean drilling programme, which they hope will begin in some 12 to 18 months time.

Texas based Deb Pfeiffer, who is head of the Falklands exploration project and Julie Tushingham, who is the External Affairs Manager for subsidiary, BHP Billiton Petroleum (America) Inc's global exploration programme, said that it was still too early to say what impact drilling operations would have on the lives of people in the Falklands. They seemed confident, however, that the company's programme would not be impeded by the melt-down of financial institutions going on in other parts of the world.

Since they entered into a licence farm-in agreement with Falkland Oil and Gas Ltd in October 2007 and acquired a 51% holding in the company, the presence of global exploration giant, BHP Billiton, has considerably increased inter-

est in oil exploration in Falklands waters.

Described as the world's largest diversified resources company, as at June 30, 2008, by their own reckoning BHP Billiton had some 41,000 employees working in over 100 operations in 25 countries.

BHP Billiton was formed in 2001 from a merger of two successful companies with historical roots going back on both sides to the 19th century

the 19th century.

The merged company, which has headquarters in Melbourne and London, has substantial interests in oil, gas, liquefied natural gas and diamonds. Other commodities in which the company has major interests include aluminium, energy coal and metallurgical coal, copper, manganese, iron ore, uranium, nickel, silver and titanium minerals.

Currently involved in oil exploration in ten different countries, BHP Billiton has extensive experience of drilling in deep water environments.

Iron Duke heads South

HMS Iron Duke, which was recently involved in anti – drug smuggling work in the Caribbean, has officially taken over South Atlantic Patrol duties.

A British forces spokesperson confirmed that the vessel is undertaking routine duties as she continues South and is due to put in to port in the Falkland Islands around October 20

October 20.

HMS Iron Duke, which recently hosted His Royal Highness Prince William, takes over duties from HMS Liverpool.

In September, HMS Iron Duke landed a mobile command team ashore in the hurricane devastated island of Grand Turk, Turks and Caicos Islands. A field headquarters designed to coordinate the relief efforts and to act as a communications link between the shore party and Iron Duke was set up.

HMS Iron Duke was deployed to the Caribbean region in late June and was involved in counter narcotics work with the US Coastguard, as well as providing re-assurance to the UK Overseas Territories.

Court news

APPEARING in court on Wednesday, before Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds, Mrs Jeanette Macaskill, who is accused of drink driving and two other minor, but related offences, allegedly committed on May 25, had her case adjourned until Friday October 17 to allow for a possible change of plea, following the introduction of a new witness statement.

Also adjourned until November 12, for evidence to be considered, was the case against Adrian James Minnell, who is accused of assault.

Stabbing investigation

AN incident at Mount Pleasant where a man was stabbed is under investigation by the Royal Falkland Islands Police.

Chief of Police, Superintendent Elliott confirmed that a 23 year-old male Private soldier was arrested on Sunday October 12, at an accommodation wing at Mount Pleasant in relation to a serious offence in which a 21 year-old male Lance Corporal was assaulted and received stab wounds to his neck and back.

Supt Elliott said the alleged offender was taken to Stanley Police Station where the RFIP are conducting a full investigation in partnership with the military police.

The suspect has since been released on police bail.

The injured person was transported by helicopter to the hospital where he received treatment and has since been discharged.

ARRIVING somewhat early to Pune in India, the venue for the Commonwealth Youth Games, the Falklands team of badminton players and shooters discovered that the athletes' village was still not ready; in fact, in the words of Team Manager Steve Dent, it was still a building site.

The Falklands doubles team of Julian Barton and Drew Robertson went down 21-5 and 21-7 against the New Zealand pair of Ashraf Dhoray and Oli Leydon Davis.

In the end, although they played well over all, high class competition, concentration-sapping heat and the stress of the occasion defeated the badminton players, said Steve, but all gained valuable experience.

Shooters Bono McKay and Murray Middleton fared slightly better, with Murray even making the final of the 25m free pistol shoot, despite equipment problems.

Murray scored a respectable 236 in the 50m Free Pistol event on the first day of competition. This event is recognised as one of the most difficult disciplines in small bore pistol.

His opponent, the well respected Ankush Bhardwaj of India, took the first Indian gold with 509 from 600.

Murray Middleton can be extremely pleased with his performance in the 25m pistol event scoring 356 out of 600, which is one hundred and twenty better than

his previous best; this with a borrowed gun and in an event where he had had very little practice at such a level.

Among the benefits of participation for Murray Middleton was the offer of future coaching by a well-respected England coach.

On the first day of the shot-gun events, Bono McKay held his own in Olympic trap, with a very respectable 17, 17 and 14 making a total of 48 out of 75. The heat and concentration got the better of him in the last round. The leader was the Maltese shooter on 68, so Bono was not too far behind.

The next day was fairly disappointing for Bono with a 13 and 14 both out of 25. This meant that he finished off his Olympic Trap 125 with a total of 76 out of 125.

Indian Shooter Keyana Darius Chenai took overall gold with 128 out of 150.

KMZ Electronics have now completed the maintenance and relocation of all the repeaters on both the East and West Falklands,

The Mount Caroline Repeater (Frequency 147.725 (- .600)) now covers the majority of the area North of the West Falklands which includes all the outer islands in that area, Chartres, Port Howard and the Port Howard Road. This repeater also covers part of San Carlos and Port San Carlos, Cape Dolphin and north of Goose Green including Saladero.

The Mount Alice Repeater (Frequency 147.825 (- .600)) now covers the south of the West Falklands, including the whole of Fox Bay, Port Stevens and all the outer Islands in this area. This repeater also covers the mid and south area of Lafonia.

The Mount Kent link (Frequency 147.125 (+ .600)) is straight into Stanley without feedback or trail on the repeater. This covers the majority of the North Camp Tracks, including all farms in this area on the

The Mount Pleasant Peak Link (Frequency 147.225 (+ .600)) which covers the north section of Lafonia. Goose Green, Lively Island, Stanley and the Mare Harbour Road.

Sappers Hill link (Frequency 146.625) which covers the whole of Stanley.

The Royal Falkland Islands Police maintain a listening watch on the 146.625 frequency, which ties in all the repeaters listed above.

Planning to paddle around the Islands

NEW York City based kayaker Marcus Demuth will attempt to circumnavigate all 776 Falkland Islands by sea kayak, a journey of over 850 miles, next year.

The goal of the expedition, which is planned to take place in January and February, is to be the first kayaker to successfully circumnavigate the 776 Falkland Islands and to document and study the marine wild life of the outer Falkland Islands.

Islander Leiv Poncet succeeded in circumnavigating East and West Falklands and Weddell Island in his kayak in 2003, however if Marcus succeeds with his expedition it is thought he will be the first kayaker in history to circumnavigate all 776 of the Islands archipelago.

Marcus' previous expeditions have taken him to Iceland, Ireland, the South and West Coast of Aus-



tralia, and Chile/Patagonia under the sponsorship of Kokatal, Lendal Paddles and Nigel Dennis Kayaks.

Out of my window

A column in which Inspector Len McGill of the Royal Falkland Islands Police takes an occasional look outside as the new prison and station renovations take shape...

PAUL SIMON wrote a wonderful song for his album. There Goes Rhymin Simon. It was called "One Man's Ceiling is Another Man's Floor," and was released in May 1973. The song came to mind as I watched the activities of the past two weeks. As the songster put it "There's been some strange goin's on and some folks have come and gone."

The watchers have become the watched: it's their own fault, they elevated their work area to the first floor and constantly walked past my window. I was fascinated as I watched the construction of a new type of formwork to allow for the pouring of the reinforced concrete first floor. As well as forming the floor of the first floor, this will provide the ceiling of the prison area. The formwork was built up over the two completed cells on the west wall of the prison and extended across to the north wall. One large slab will be the result, covering the entire western half of the building.

There had been much debate. among my colleagues, about how the floor was to be constructed. Their suggestions ranged from precast concrete slabs being craned in and pieced together like some giant jigsaw puzzle, to various, sometimes fanciful ideas, such as spraying concrete onto "special steel mesh." Some of the older members of the community may smile, as they remember the first time such an idea was used in the Falklands. 'Gunniting' was used to construct the first School Hostel building in the Falklands; it is often seen today being used to stabilise and strengthen the inner walls of tunnel projects.

The whole area was steadily covered, at ceiling level from the prison perspective, with heavy duty, plastic-covered, multiply board. This boarding was placed upon large timbers which formed supporting joists. The joists themselves were supported by large metal girders, held aloft by quantities of 'acrojacks' resting on the prison area floor. This required very accurate adjustment and placement so that the slab, when cast, would sit comfortably on the top of the completed cell and exterior walls. Meticulous preparation is required to ensure that the structure can withstand the considerable weight that such a large quantity of wet concrete will place upon it and not allow concrete to squeeze its way out of gaps. Complete support is essential to prevent a "saggy ceiling"

This work blocked my view of the eastern side of the prison. However I could hear the familiar sound of the Stihl saw cutting blocks. A well-timed glance out of my window enabled me to catch a glimpse of a toothy smile as the head of the block layer appeared above the floor formwork. He was labouring away building the internal walls of the three cells that line the eastern wall.

It appears that two of these cells are at topping-off level and if the weather continues to be kind, this block of cells will soon be complete. No pressure of course, but the internal block work has to be completed to allow the second half of the concrete floor to be formed.

With the completion of the supporting formwork, the gang of workers presented themselves at my window level and started work on preparing the metal reinforcing matrix.

A combination of sunny dry conditions and vast amounts of very large sheets of paper drawings caused me to consider a risk of fire. The source of ignition would be the vast amount of friction caused by the considerable scratching of heads that was occurring.

Many 'strangers' appeared, some in ties and suits. They also scratched their heads, turned plans this way and that and gesticulated wildly to emphasize their explanations before disappearing. Slowly, reinforcing bar was bent and shaped and placed around the

three exterior edges of the floor slab. I noticed that the floor was extended toward my window at floor level, a clear indication that my window may soon become a door.

Shakespeare said that "life's a stage and every one's a player" or words to that effect and this appeared to be true, as the crazy sunshine and warmth convinced the workmen that they were on an elevated stage. I was treated to rounds of singing as the morning request show rang out from the radio. Renditions of such diverse great classics as "Love Shack" and 'Calling all The Heroes" floated in through the open window, capped off with a 'meaty' version of "Like a Bat Out of Hell." It must be an indication that some of these men have been working together too long as occasionally I'm sure I could hear some close harmony! Thanks for the entertainment fellas, it was one of the most enjoyable days at work I have had for some time.

Further reinforcing bar was laid out across the area and wire tied into a large square mesh. Boxes were strategically placed to form access through the floor for services, which required further fancy metal work. This lower mesh was raised off the formwork by 'concrete butterflies' or X's to allow the concrete to flow under it.

There then followed a mindboggling array of angled metal, with tooth-shaped edges set at forty five degrees across the first square mesh. This in turn supported long metal structures in a triangular shape, much like large Toblerone chocolate bars. These were, in their turn, topped off with yet another reinforcing bar mesh.

An intricate pattern was discernable, lovingly created by many hands and hundreds of wire ties. It seems such a pity that their work will soon be lost in a mass of grey concrete. The tensile strength of such a slab of concrete is created almost entirely by the metal reinforcing structure within

It's Monday October 13, and from my window I see the arrival of a concrete delivery bucket and a crane. The formwork looks complete and an air of anticipation has settled over the site.

Am I to hear the 'Toot' of the concrete mixer truck tomorrow as it delivers loads of ready mix? Am I to witness the creation of one man's ceiling and another man's floor?

WHILE Stanley students have been getting to grips with work at MPA, the children of the Mount Pleasant school have been finding out what life on Falkland Islands farms is all

Wool market report

for October 10

By Ian Campbell, Department of Agriculture

THE Australian dollar dropped in value dramatically in a turbulent week of world financial troubles which fluctuated widely during the wool sales.

The Australian Wool Market AWEX indicator increased 10 cents this week to 868 cents.

In pence the AWEX is down

44p from £3.83 to £3.39 Whilst this is an artifact of exchange rates it can still have serious implications if selling wool onto the world market in pounds, a relatively stronger currency than the Australian Dollar.

China is still by far the biggest buyer of wool at the moment.

South Africa and New Zealand markets reacted similarly to their own currency fluctuations.

Exchange rates used to convert wool prices into pence per kg clean basis, Australian \$2.56 per LE sterling, well down from \$2,24 last

Cheeky Chinstrap enjoys the limelight

Conservation and their helpers continue to care for oiled birds

FALKLANDS Conservation has once again swapped its usual office duties for catching and scrubbing oiled penguins, with the appreciated assistance of the Veterinary Section of the Agriculture Department and other volunteers.

The latest casualties have been mainly King and Gentoo penguins, but with the arrival of the breeding season, oiled Rockhoppers and a Chinstrap penguin have joined the motley crew.

Sarah Crofts of Falklands Conservation said the Chinstrap found in Stanley Harbour was slightly off course from its normal Antarctic range and has fast become a popular crowd puller for the 'Happy Feet Mob."

Taking advantage of the few sunny days over the last fortnight. Falklands Conservation have supervised a volunteer training programme in caring for oiled birds, demonstrating the methods used in removing the oil and general handling and caring of the birds. As a result they now have a dozen trained helpers that can assist in caring for oiled penguins.

"Õiled birds have been arriving in slow, steady spats around the Falklands since June and the main concern is whether we will keep seeing oiled penguins throughout the breeding season," said Sarah.

Recent surveys have indicated that the colonies of Rockhoppers arriving in Berkeley Sound have not been affected by oil, although most of the oiled birds have been found around Surf Bay. Cape Pembroke and there have been re-

ports of oiled Magellanics at Gypsy Cove. Any upcoming salvage work on the Ocean 8, the trawler which sank in Berkeley Sound in May this year carrying 137 metric tonnes of gas oil and heavy fuel oil, will also need to be carefully monitored to prevent further oil pollution during this sensitive time of the year for wildlife, said Sarah. Conservation have been working to raise funds to improve facilities for rehabilitating oiled penguins. The pre-Charity Ball exhibition raised £800 from artwork donated specifically for the cause. Sarah concluded: "We are still far from having the ideal set up in the Falklands, but are continually ********************** impressed with the support and goodwill - for example, over a tonne of rock cod and squid from Polar Ltd., yes penguins eat a lot and the time and hard work given by volunteers. Fledgling Kings tracked over 20,000 kms

TEN months after fledgling King penguins were equipped with satellite transmitters at Volunteer Point on East Falkland they have been recorded up to 5,000 kilometres away.

Penguin biologist Dr Klemens Pütz. of the Antarctic Research Trust, sitting in his office in Germany has just received the final transmissions from the birds direct to his email.

He explained that of the Falklands penguins, the King is the most oceanic. "In early winter they go as far as the Antarctic Peninsula to find food, even when they have chicks," said Dr Pütz. He added that to understand how resilient the population at Volunteer Beach is to changes in the ocean, they need to know where the chicks go during their first year.

Soon after the young, tagged penguins discovered the skills of swimming and seeking out fish and squid, some went southeast or northeast of the Falklands to the Antarctic Polar Frontal Zone, but others decided to migrate westwards or well south, into truly Antarctic waters.

One hundred days into their first year at sea, most birds had headed

westwards from their locations into the Pacific Ocean, up to 4,000 km away from Volunteer Beach. However. one of the ten king penguin chicks headed eastwards and nine months after leaving Volunteer Beach was about 5,000 km away, south of South Africa at the northern border of the winter pack-ice.

Some of the chicks swam more than 20,000 km during the nine month period

month period.

Dr Pütz explained that the tracking study has shown that King penguins must be born with some innate ability to swim and catch prey, despite spending their first year ashore being fed by their parents. "The ten chicks from Volunteer Beach seemed relatively proficient at finding good places to feed," he added.

The data will soon be analysed and, together with information obtained from fledgling King penguins from South Georgia, be related to oceanographic parameters such as productivity, sea temperature and pack ice concentration.

Dr. Pütz is hopeful that after a few years at sea, the chicks studied will return to the colony to increase the breeding numbers.

Blue Bus service under threat

IN its nineteenth year of helping the elderly and infirm of Stanley to do their shopping, the Blue Bus service is under threat, due to lack of customers.

According to Councillor and long-time Blue Bus driver, John Birmingham, the twice-weekly shopping run, which up to six months ago could count on between four to six passengers, now regularly caters for only one or two.

Cllr Birmingham told Penguin News that the Committee of the Blue Bus Trust, the charity which owns and runs the bus - the fourth since the service started - had recently expressed concern about the low numbers using the service.

In the light of the present low level of use, Cllr Birmingham reported that the Committee had decided that the service should be publicised prior to the beginning of "a three month trial period, at the end of which a decision will be made about its future."

Apart from the value of the bus itself, which was still in very good condition and very low mileage, the Trust had over two thousand pounds in the bank, said Cllr Birmingham. The members: himself, Tim Blake, Sue Howatt and Felicity MacArthur did not want to end the service, but were concerned about the waste of these assets, which could be channelled to other good causes.

Mr Birmingham suggested that if the charity were wound up, these assets could be reallocated, without loss of the blue bus service, if the hospital would allow the use of its newly aquired 'community bus' by the Blue Bus Committee.

The Blue Bus currently operates twice a week, on Monday and Friday, starting in each case at 1.30pm. Mr Birmingham said it is available to anyone, regardless of age, who is incapable of shopping independently and can take its passengers anywhere they want to go within the boundaries of Stanley.

The name of the duty driver and the telephone number to call is announced each Monday and Friday, on the lunch time announcements of Falkland Islands Radio.

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

The ups and downs of the FIGAS shuttle

THE Islands are experiencing change with internal transport systems of late with an improved ferry service between East and West Falklands, while the Government's air service (FIGAS) has been operating a new model shuttle system around the Islands.

The shuttle, which has been in operation since the beginning of October, might be seen as a less convenient service than the air-taxi system enjoyed for many years, however most of the customers contacted by *Penguin News* seemed satisfied with the service, particularly the parents of children who board at the Stanley House Hostel while attending school in Stanley.

General Manager of FIGAS. Shaun Minto explained that it is important that the new two-trer operating model is considered in its entirety. The shuttle is only one half of the two trer model, the other being commercial operations. "The purpose of the shuttle model is to move as many passengers as possible, using as few resources as possible," he said.

While there is some potential to reduce direct operating costs through gains in efficiency, the main aim of the shuttle model is to release pilot and aircraft resources for use on the second tier commercial operations, which is the only way FIGAS can hope to reduce the public subsidy (currently in the order of £1.25m), said Mr Minto.

One of the main means of generating commercial revenue is by charter flights for tourists groups, an initiative that has had a mixed reception from the tourism industry, with only one of the two main tour providers actively promoting the concept, he said.

"Despite this, we have already quoted approximately £30,000 of full-cost charter revenue, including the successful visit by the Pelle Mohlin tour group," (as reported recently by PN).

Earnings forecasts for the current year will undoubtedly be affected by variables, which include the new ferry service and the impact of the credit crunch on tourism numbers, however Mr Minto said that, assuming the total number of passengers remain constant, he expects total revenues to increase by approximately £200,000 in this financial year.

gramme on Wednesday, I was heartened to hear Councillor Richard Cockwell say, "I don't think we can afford not to" in relation to whether the Falklands could afford a deep water port. There were, he argued, some things "that just have to be done" to encourage development and to avoid expensive propping up of inadequate infrastructure in the future.

Clearly this is an argument that has found favour many times in the past in the Falklands; if it had not, I do not suppose we would have an air service, Camp roads, an islands-wide communications network, a cross sound ferry or an abattoir. While many, if not all, of these projects might have been regarded as a waste of money at the time and some are still the subject of debate, it is fair to say that they have all made a tremendous difference to the quality of life in the Falklands and in some cases are edging towards some sort of financial viability. Almost without exception, there would now be a tremendous public outcry if they were to be taken away, merely as a government costcutting measure.

I admit that in the past I have probably been sceptical about FIDC's involvement in the dairy, but when I started to think about the wider consequences of the dairy's closure. I began to see it as perhaps another of those things that, "have to be done." Consequently, I was a bit disappointed to hear Cllr Cockwell say that the FIDC decision to withdraw further financial support from the dairy had been made

"purely for financial reasons."

True FIDC has invested a lot of money - yours, if you are a tax payer, and mine - in the dairy. While it continues to operate, there is a fighting chance of re-couping some of that investment. If it closes, it is certain that there is not and that very little of that expenditure will be recovered. In other words, that money - yours and mine - will have been completely wasted and probably for ever. A dairy is not like a machine shop; you cannot turn it to making other than dairy products and if you just mothball it and wait for more favourable market conditions, it will take considerable time and expense to start up again.

There is also a political aspect to this. It fits badly with our aspirations towards being an autonomous, self-determining country to depend utterly on imports for one of the most basic of foods. Aside from giving up any kind of control over future prices, any kind of hiccup in the present supply chain could lead to serious shortages. History has shown that our supply links to and from the continental mainland are sensitive to interference from our large and aggressive neighbour. Argentina already has its hand on the Chilean gas tap, do we want to give them the opportunity to control our milk supplies as well?

As with past attempts to produce eggs and chickens in commercial quantities locally, the argument will be produced that the cost of importing animal feed exceeds the likely profit and makes what appears to be a home-grown, self sufficient product, uneconomic and import dependent. The comparison is not exact, however, we do not grow grain, but we do have lots of land on which grass grows, however sparsely. Before the introduction of sheep, the Falklands were exclusively cattle country and supported huge herds. Are we now denying the historical record by saying that it is impossible to rear dairy cows in the Falklands, unless we stuff them full of supplements?

In relying entirely on foreign producers of an important source of nutrition, we give up control over its quality. Recent experiences with Chinese milk elsewhere in the world indicates what a potential health

risk comes with this dependence.

My understanding is that the equipment currently in the dairy conforms with current standards of health and hygiene and produces a product which is pasteurised. With the dairy closed, it is entirely possible that small farms connected to Stanley by the road system will begin to invest in a few cows and start supplying milk without control and using whatever containers come to hand, to that hardy ten per cent who don't like the heat-treated product at any price. Do we really want to go back to the time when Stanley's milk was un-pasteurised, no doubt occasionally swimming with bacteria and delivered in old and

imperfectly cleaned booze bottles?

If ninety per cent of Stanley's population will now only take their milk in UHT form, which I doubt, perhaps we should be thinking about investing in the necessary plant to produce it locally. One of any government's aims should be to encourage the substitution of locally produced goods for foreign imports, wherever possible. This applies here as much as anywhere else. Striving to export Falklands meat, for example, makes no sense if we then go and buy it back again in frozen convenience foods or tins of expensive cat food. While our farms are still producing animals, consumers' choices could be nudged by government tariff barriers or prohibitions on selected meat imports. With the dairy gone, we shall have no such option when it comes to milk, cream, cheese, or any other dairy products. Am I alone in thinking that for the Falklands not to have at least the possibility of fresh cream on its comflakes constitutes a national disgrace?

Rockhopper denies BHP buy-in

Exploration, which holds licences in the North Falkland Basin, both alone and in partnership with Desire Petroleum, this week denied a report of a buy-in by exploration giant, BHP Billiton, which had appeared in the Financial Times.

A spokesperson for the company said the group has not entered into any agreement with BHP. He confirmed however that it is in discussion with a number of potential farm-out partners and is also continuing the search for a rig in conjunction with other operators in the North Falkland Ba-

"Rockhopper has no debt and had cash of over £4 million in September 2008 (Rockhopper's half year end). The financial position of the Company has been unaffected by the recent turnioil in global banking," said the spokesper-

Rockhopper holds a 100% interest in North Falkland Basin Licences PL023, PL024 PL032 and PL033 and holds a 7.5% interest in Licences PL003 and PL004.

Technical work done by Rockhopper on their licence areas has, the company claims, indicated unrisked recoverable reserves of 4.3billion barrels and in addition has identified a multi trillion cubic feet gas prospect. The acreage has both proven oil and proven gas and is located in relatively shallow water.

Work underatken at the time of admission to AiM indicated that a discovery on Rockhopper acreage could be commercially viable at oil prices as low as US\$25 per barrel.

Calming news on troubled waters

SOME good news for Falkland Islands investors in local oil exploration was provided this week by a report in the Investors Chronicle.

Writers, Richard Hemming and Graeme Davies, reported that Falkland Oil and Gas Ltd (FOGL) had been among a small number of companies, "bouncing back from heavily oversold positions" in recent days.

The report claims that oil and gas explorers are benefiting from the expectation that Opec will cut production quotas at its emergency meeting this week, stemming the precipitous slide in the oil price.

According to the Investors' Chronicle, the recent big gainers in the small-cap oil sector have been companies like FOGL, which were, "adequately financed, at or close to production, or involved in possible industry consolidation.

Paul Mumford, fund manager at Cavendish Asset Management, was quoted in the article as saying that small companies were more likely to find support from investors as, "a reasonable find can be completely transformational," offering a far greater return in the case of a lucky strike than oil giants like BP, whose exploration successes merely replenish reserves they have already extracted.

Ocean 8 oil clearance gets underway

AS reported last week PN, work has begun in Berkeley Sound on removing the oil from the sunken Korean trawler, Ocean 8.

Speaking on Falkland Islands Radio, on Thursday, Director of Fisheries, John Barton, reported that the salvage vessel, MV Tasnui, was now moored over the wreck. After initial surveys, holes had been drilled through the hull into fuel tanks and pumping operations had begun.

Some of the areas which should have contained oil had been found to be empty or to contain less oil than expected, said Mr Barton, supporting observations by the Korean divers that some oil had escaped to other areas of the vessel.

Intially, movement around the wreck had resulted in stirring up some of this escaped oil, briefly increasing the size of the visible oil slick in Berkeley Sound, but leaking points had been plugged and the slick reduced to previous levels, said Mr

The operation has been monitored closely by the Fisheries Department with frequent visits by officers and surveillance from the patrol vessel Protegat which had also undertaken a survey of the coastline in Berekeley Sound without discovering evidenc of oil ashore or on seabirds.

The Fisheries Department had also taken soundings of the MV Tasnui's oil tanks so that an accurate measurement of the quantity of oil extracted from Ocean 8 can be achieved, once the operation is

ONE Port Howard resident said she had concerns about the freight system which is now slower, as there are more passengers being carried and freight has a lower prority. However, on the plus side, the later flights are definitely a bonus, as the Camp school children boarding in Stanley are able to take advantage of the late Friday flight to get home for long weekends.

This had been a bone of contention with parents on West Falkland for many years and Tex Alazia had campaigned long and hard to have a system in place that would allow his children to spend the maximum amount of their holiday time at their home at Port Edgar. He is happy with the service and feels it should be given time before any judgements are made. "There are a lot of changes happening with the trans-port systems and if FIGAS are getting around, doing the job and saving money, it's to the good," he said.

Joyce Halliday at Fox Bay said she had taken advantage of the earlier flight time and had flown to town where she had her hair done, visited friends and was, "home in time to feed the hens and cook the supper." It was an outing she would not have been able to undertake from West Falkland when the taxi-like service was operational, she said.

Hill Cove resident Shelley Nightingale said she doesn't use FIGAS much as the ferry service suits her needs better, however she had heard a lot of praise from people who have children in Stanley House. "I've heard it jokingly called the shambles, rather than the shuttle service, but I really don't think that is justified," she added.

West Falkland business man Dave Dunford of Saddle Computers said he hadn't had a lot of dealing with FIGAS since the shuttle's inception, but thought that although it might make business sense, in that it should save a few gallons of fuel, "it is succeeding in destroying an organisation that previously worked very well." FIGAS is now in danger of collapsing altogether, with no one apart from an outside expert left to run it, he said, adding, "Normally we could expect our councillors to intervene, but I've no faith at all in the current bunch.

Tourism operators

Alan White operates Pebble Lodge on the far west, with his partner Jacqui Jennings. Not able to take advantage of the improved ferry service, they are reliant on FIGAS operations. "It's early days, too soon to criticise or write it off," said Alan.

However, Rural Business Association Committee Member, Susie Hansen, said she had received expressions of concern from some people in the tourist industry, particularly when visitors have long waits when connecting from one shuttle to another.

This was backed up by Sea Lion Lodge operators who said they were experiencing difficulties with tourists sometimes arriving as late as 7pm and then having an early departure the next day, not to mention a long wait in Stanley between shuttles, eating into what is generally a short stay for the visitor.

International Tours and Travel are happy with the present service and say that the take-up has been high for the LAN connection which enables visitors to get out to the wildlife as quickly as possible. "The price has not deterred people, as making the most of their time in the Falklands is more important," said Sally

"I think one of the major problems is just that we, as locals, are finding the change difficult, but tourists, unless they are unwittingly used as sounding boards to air grievances about the new system, will not know any different. As long as the shuttles operate in a timely and efficient manner, with no long layover in Stanley between shuttles, then they have no reason to be disgruntled with the service," she said.

It was interesting, said Sally, that a recent group of overseas tour operators in the Falklands on a familiaristion trip commented that the flights in themselves were, "a great selling point for the Falklands.

The new shuttle service is still in its infancy and has experienced the inevitable teething problems, but they do seem to be being ironed out now that the service is operating at full strength, with all shuttles being utilised, Sally concluded.

The Falkland Islands Tourist Board Manager Jake Downing, said it was still early days: "I think the industry will get a clear picture of the system once there are larger tourist numbers on the Islands which will start around November.

WINDS gusting up to forty knots swept Stanley Harbour on Saturday afternoon, changing for ever the appearance of one of the most photographed town's landmarks.

Before the startled gaze of several nearby householders and the Manager of Stanley's Museum, the whole bow section of the hulk of the Jhelum, collapsed down to the waterline, taking with it, no doubt, the nests of a small colony of cor-

of Stanley harbour was beginning to see a considerable quantity of flotsam from the Jhelum and the Falkland Islands Company's launch, Speedwell - currently acting as the Government's Harbour Patrol Vessel - could be seen towing away some substantial baulks of timber.

Fisheries Officer, John Adams, confirmed that the Fisheries Department had ordered Monday's tidy-up operation, after an inspection on Sunday, but warned that although the harbour was free of floating debris as a result of this

operation, the situation could easily change. There was, he said, some discussion going on within Government to determine who had responsibility for the remaining wrecks and hulks in and around Stanley's harbour.

Jhelum, which was built in Liverpool in 1849, was the oldest of the nineteenth century wooden sailing ships which found a final resting place in Stanley's harbour and one of only a handful of vessels of the same type which have survived in the world.

In an excellent book on the Jhelum which he wrote with colleague and wooden boat preservation expert, John Kearon, Keeper of the Merseyside Maritime Museum, Mike Stammers, now retired, describes the Jhelum as, "an everyday ship, of a type that was seen in hundreds in the ports of Victorian Britain and the Empire." Writing in 1990, when he was engaged in a major survey of the hulk, which was then in a much more solid condition, Stammers said "It is a lucky chance that the climate of the Falklands has been conducive to the preservation of the Jhelum" but went on to admit that it would be difficult to preserve indefinitely a ship that, "deserves to be famous for being ordinary."

Despite its unhappy ending, Jhelum's story is a proud one and typical of many from an era when the fledgling town of Stanley might well have foundered, had it not been for a huge expansion of trade between Europe and South America, requiring many more tall ships to make the perilous passage around Cape Horn.

The position of the Falkland Islands, just 500 miles to the north of the Horn made Stanley a port of refuge for storm-battered ships like Jhelum, making the passage from the Atlantic Ocean to the Pacific or vice-versa

According to Stammers and Kearon, between 1840 and 1860 the expansion of world trade, led by the United Kingdom, grew between 5.6 and 4.8 per cent, per an-

Liverpool was at the time Britain's leading port for exports with don's 23 per cent.

It was against this background that the *Jhelum*, a wooden three-masted ship was launched. Her builders, Joseph Steel and Sons, were also merchants and ran her mainly to the West Coast of South America, carrying general cargo out and copper, nitrates and wool homeward until 1863, when she was sold.

Under her new owners, Jhelum was chiefly used for the circular trade in guano and coal, which had recently developed between Europe and South America's west coast. On the outward voyage, ships would carry coal from England and Wales and return with guano - fossilised bird droppings from Chile and Peru to enrich British farm lands.

Both cargoes were notoriously

wrote in the ship's log, "Barque Jhelum put into this port in distress, having experienced heavy gales during the passage made her leak and damage part of the cargo and considered not safe to proceed further on her voyage.

Eventually condemned and abandoned, Jhelum became a storage hulk and jetty head.

Various attempts to stabilise Jhelum's condition over the years have been hampered by infestations of rot, worm and even a fire. In the end all foundered for lack of funds, despite heroic fund-raising efforts by Community School stu-

Now it seems more than ever likely that Jhelum will follow Charles Cooper, Snowsquall, Acteon and William Shand into oblivion, all of them once visible ex-





dangerous to the ships that carried them, particularly if they got wet, but despite this, Mike Stammers tells us that Jhelum had made no fewer than eighteen round trips and was returning from Callao on her nineteenth, with 500 tons of guano, when she put into Stanley on August 1871, in what was described as "a sinking condition".

Court news

Fined for sleeping at the wheel

FALLING asleep at the wheel cost Royal Falkland Islands Police Reserve Police Constable Robert Brook Hoy, £500 in court on Wednesday.

The court heard that Mr Hoy, of Stanley, was driving home from Mount Pleasant at around 6am on October 1, when his vehicle, a 130 Land Rover, belonging to Cable and Wireless, left the road close to the boundary with Newans farm, hit a gate and then rolled over.

Mr Hoy and his passenger, Mr Alan Pickersgill, also a Cable and Wireless employee, both escaped unhurt, but considerable damage was caused to the vehicle.

Mr Hoy and Mr Pickersgill had finished work at Mount Pleasant at 4.30pm the previous day, but then had been asked to work overtime, commencing at 10pm. Crown Counsel Trevor Archer said the work had gone on longer than expected, with the result that by the time Mr Hoy started to drive home,

he had had only two hours sleep in the previous twenty-four hours.

Mr Archer said that Mr Hoy had other options besides driving home; he could have slept at MPA or taken a taxi home, but he made the wrong decision and put other people at risk.

Sentencing Mr Hoy, who had pleaded guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention, Senior Magistrate. Clare Faulds, said the court had taken into account the commercial pressure that Mr Hoy had been under, but also had noted that he was a reserve police constable and therefore, "should have known better." He had not only put himself and his passenger at risk, by his action, but also other road users.

Mr Hoy said that he was very sorry and realised that he was also very lucky to be able to appear before the court. He had made a mistaken judgement, which would not happen again.

Adjournments for assault and theft cases

JASON Morris and Charlotte McRae, both of Stanley also appeared in court on Wednesday.

Mr Morris, who is already facing a charge of causing actual bodily harm to his former partner. Patricia Paredes Villablanca, heard three new charges, which had arisen from the investigation into his case. No plea was entered for the further charges of assault and threatening behaviour amounting to harrassment and defence lawyer Richard Marlor was granted an adjournment to go over the fresh charges with his client.

A similar request was made and granted to Mr Marlor in the case of Ms McRae, who faced two charges of theft and one of attempted theft.

These crimes are alleged to have been committed in July this year at 9 Narrows View Stanley, the home of Mr Roy Davis.

The cases against both Mr Morris and Ms McRae were adjourned until October 27.

Your questions answered

Q WHY has the Industrial Estate become a dumping ground for a great number of un-roadworthy and unsightly vehicles?

A Charlene Rowland of FIDC replied: "Those tenants of Lookout Industrial Estate who own unroadworthy vehicles are currently working towards removing them and tidying the area generally.

Q Are there any proposals for the freight rates on the Government Air Service (FIGAS) to be increased to £5 minimum cost?

A Shaun Minto, General Manager of FIGAS, replied:

The FIGAS Review document identified that freight rates would need to be addressed in the future, however there were no specific recommendations regarding freight in the final EXCO paper.

The EXCO decision on the FIGAS review paper included an additional requirement that "freight rates on FIGAS must not be cheaper than by sea"

In line with this requirement, a review of freight rates is now underway and comparisons are being made with the cost of surface freight, which has a £3 administration charge for all freight consignments.

A range of options are being considered, including the adoption of UK Royal Mail standard parcel rates for freight up to 10kg. This would see a minimum charge of £4.20 for freight up to 2kg.

The Post Office Order links parcel post rates to FIGAS freight rates, so we will be working with the Postmaster to produce a combined report for ExCo consideration at some stage in the future.

As always, no changes will be made to FIGAS freight rates without the specific approval of Councillors.

One year disqualification and £400 fine for drink driving

ON Friday Jeannette May Macaskill of Stanley changed her plea to guilty after evidence from a forensic expert revealed that she may have unittingly consumed more alcohol than she had previously thought.

Mrs Macaskill had initially pleaded not guilty to a charge of drink driving on May 25 when she had collided with a parked car on Ross Road West.

Crown Counsel Trevor Archer said Mrs Macaskill, who had her grandchildren in the car at the time, did not stop and report the accident but continued to the Stanley Arms where she consumed two drinks.

Forensic evidence concluded that Mrs Macaskill must have been mistaken in the amount she claimed to have consumed at the Rose Bar after finishing her shift behind the bar and calculated that her alcohol level would have been 46mg per 100ml when driving.

Defence lawyer Richard Marlor said Mrs Macaskill had told the landlord at the Stanley Arms she had had an accident, intended to report it and needed a drink to calm her nerves. He said that she had been dazzled by the headlights of an oncoming vehicle and since the incident had only driven once after dark

as she was now extremely nervous. His client was he said, of impeccable character and extremely sorry for what had happened.

It was their case that the amount of alcohol Mrs Macaskill had consumed prior to driving was taken unwittingly, said Mr Marlor.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds sitting with Justice of the Peace Dawn Hoy disqualified Mrs Macaskill from driving for 12 months and fined her £400 plus £70 prosecution costs.

The earlier charges of failing to stop and report an accident were dismissed after the prosecution offered no evidence.

Role reversal for former CBFSAIs

TWO former Commanders of British Forces in the Falkland Islands met recently in the sunnier surroundings of Cyprus.

On October 16, Air Vice-Marshal Lacey relinquished his post as Commander British Forces Cyprus and Administrator of the Sovereign Base Areas, to Major General Jamie Gordon.

This was a reversal of a previous encounter in 2004, at Mount Pleasant in the Falkland Islands, when the then Brigadier Gordon, handed over command of British Forces in the South Atlantic to the then Air Commodore Richard Lacey.

The commander of the Sovereign Base Areas/British Forces Cyprus (CBF) is either a Major General or an Air Vice Marshal, alternating every three years, transferring the command between the British Army and the Royal Air Force. Consequently, the Deputy British Forces Cyprus (DBFC) is from the opposite service of the commander, either a Brigadier or an Air Commodore.

Explore South Georgia from home

A NEW visualisation tool for exploring the subantarctic islands of South Georgia was unveiled on Wednesday.

The South Georgia Geographic Information System (SGGIS) enables researchers and the public to see the islands' environmental landscape in a completely new way and will help to manage and protect the abundant wildlife that lives there, such as the wandering albatross.

The Government of South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands commissioned GIS developers at British Antarctic Survey (BAS) to create the SGGIS. It combines a detailed interactive map of South Georgia with a variety of information such as the topography, vegetation and glacier change to historic sites, protected areas and distributions of various animals, such as seals and penguins.

British Antarctic Survey GIS manager Paul Cooper said: "The environment of South Georgia is very fragile and under pressure from introduced species, human activities and the effects of climate change. SGGIS will help to mini-

mise these impacts as the system provides more information than was previously available."

The Government of South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands views the system as an invaluable tool for future environmental management of the island, whether that be the management of invasive species, the protection of vulnerable species or the long-term monitoring and management of tourist activities.

The SGGIS information will be used to plan eradication programmes for introduced species, such as rats, which have caused ground nesting birds to desert certain areas of South Georgia. For instance, burrowing petrels and the South Georgia pipit now only nest on the smaller rat-free offshore islands and the south coast. The system is also aimed at tourists planning to visit the islands, or anyone with an interest in South Georgia, to give them a greater understanding of the geography and environment.

What happened to our 175th anniversary?

THIS year marks the 175th Anniversary of British Administration of the Falkland Islands, but where are the celebrations?

One hundred years was recognised by the Centenary set of stamps, the most recognised definitive set of stamps ever issued by the Islands that rank in the top ten most wanted list of philatelists worldwide. A bronze medallion was struck and freely distributed; and a full programme of events was organised for the community. Whalebone Arch was built on land donated by the Falkland Islands Company

The 150th anniversary saw community involvement in the definitive set of 11 stamps designed by Duffy Sheridan and Ian Strange and the commemorative coin, with Father Monaghan winning the design competition. The stamps became maxi-cards, special first day covers and calendar. There was a re-issue of currency with the date 1983 and the five pound note proclaimed "150" Anniversary 1833 – 1983"

This year we have a set of two stamps, one of a sailor and the other of marines, that only make sense if they are combined in the mini-sheet design of naval officer

under the union flag. The title is Falkland Islands and in very small print Port Louis 1833 – 2008. This reads like a memorial to the demise of the settlement, rather than a proclamation that the British flag was being raised in the King's name. The first day cover depicts Port Louis in 1836.

The real title of the event is to be found hidden in the accompanying leaflet: "This marks the beginning of permanent British set-tlement in the Falkland Islands." Nowhere on stamp or coin are the words 175th Anniversary of British Administration.

The question needs to be asked, are the Falkland Islands proud of their heritage, or has the importance of 1833 faded with time?

If there is a need to issue stamps; why only two, why disguise the real title, and why have an issue date of September 22. when the anniversary was January 3. The coin was issued last week.

Stamps and coins are used to proclaim nationality and for communities to take pride in their heritage. Can we really say that this set fulfils that criteria?

This sucker is going down NORMAL battle has been resumed. For a while back there it was like Christmas 1914 on the Western Front, when German and British soldiers emerged into no man's land to play football.

I am referring to the truce that prevailed across party politics when it seemed possible that the credit crisis was going to drag down capitalism itself. It illbehoved any party to appear to value party interests over those of the nation

David Cameron was the first to slither back down into his trench and begin spraying the battlefield with indiscriminate fire and noxious gas. He planted a few rounds on Mr Brown who, if not responsible for the fiasco, should at least have seen it coming and done something to regulate the bankers. The PM had long been saying that, under his leadership, the age of boom and bust was over and steady growth would be the norm. So he asked for it.

But the Tories, said Mr Brown, had caused it all in the first place by removing most controls from the banks and encouraging an atmosphere of grotesque greed among bankers. Fair enough.

Now, as home repossessions and redundancies usher us into recession, both parties are engaged in a petty competition, offering meagre measures to limit its length and the depth. None of it will make any difference. To quote President Bush. "This sucker is going

One final thought on the lamentable domestic UK political front: a snap general election cannot be ruled out. No one I have spoken to has suggested they would welcome it, because they still believe the national crisis deserves a more mature approach. But Mr Brown can see his stock rising as he acts boldly, and Labour might see this as its chance to win an election. Don't rule it out, but it would be a shame - and I mean that literally.

So what does it mean, down south?

I'm not talking gynaecology; rather the impact of the crisis on you, the typical PN reader. Common sense suggests you should at least be concerned and asking a few questions.

Firstly, just how safe are Islanders' savings? Not at all safe, it would seem, if they are held in some off-shore banks. We have seen in the last few days that British savers with funds in Channel Islands branches of Icelandic banks stand to lose huge amounts,



as the British Government's pledge to guarantee up to £50,000 of deposits does not extend to Icelandic banks in Guernsey and Jer-

What about funds held in the Stanley branch of the Standard Chartered Bank? Well, it seems they are pretty safe, but there are no guarantees, and this is the crucial way in which UK savers differ from those in the South Atlantic. Not long ago, the local manager of the Standard Chartered Bank said in PN that his bank is not heavily exposed to the American banking quagmire. It trades mainly in Africa and the Far East. I've done some more reading, and broadly speaking, this seems to be so, but if there is one thing that the current crisis has taught us it is that its limits cannot be pre-

Standard Chartered's upbeat message had been quite attractive to me, and I actually emailed the Stanley Branch, where I have a current account, to ask if I could transfer some savings there. I also asked - just confirming, I thought - whether the Falklands Government guarantees savers' funds up to a reasonable level. On the first count, I was advised that the bank does not offer an offshore service, so, as a UK resident, I could not open a deposit account. Fair enough. However I was very surprised to learn from the bank that the Falklands Government offers no guarantee for savers.

That appears strange. In the past, local legislators have been fast to follow in the footsteps of the UK. I recall that the Dangerous Dogs Act was drawn up post haste, in the wake of lurid tabloid reports of dogs feasting on infants. This despite the fact that the last (arguably) dangerous dog in the Falklands was a Warrah.

And what about the impact of the stock market on FI investors? Well, anyone who has been putting money into the Falklands-linked oil companies will have seen their values depreciate dramatically. Others - including those civil servants - who surrendered their oldfashioned pensions for stock market-linked plans might be worried because the value of their plans will have taken a dive.

One also wonders about Government reserves, which are, presumably, invested in a mix of cash, gilts and shares. The first two sectors are probably fine, but it would be a surprise if FIG did not invest millions in shares. There was a simplistic reassurance some weeks ago that all was OK, but it seems unfortunate that there has not been a louder demand for a detailed assessment of the impact of the crash on rainy-day funds.

But let's hear it for the heroes

Amid the chaos, only one significant group has emerged with honour: the financial journalists. For months now they have reported on the issue without sensationalising it (how could they?). They have attempted to unravel the esoteric language and explain the tangled mess of "instruments" and "services" that even those in the industry do not understand. Long may they go on asking the right questions.

Drunk with happiness or despair?

One final observation to share with you. I was driving through The City the other day when I saw a little tableau that has lodged itself in my mind. Down the street were staggering two crisplydressed and youthful city types. Both were laughing, possibly even singing, and both were very clearly drunk. They may have been lamenting or celebrating the partial nationalisation of banks, but I fear that they knew something I did not; something that will only dawn on me when their Porsches have long since driven off into the distance.Graham.bound@btinternet.com





made our way to the aircrast. Meteorological Officer James Fearnley, who had been observing the weather patterns for several days in anticipation of the flight, His Excellency the Governor and Mrs Huckle completed the group who were all soon buckled up on the webbing seats down either side of the aircraft.

The interior of the aircraft is in complete contrast to any commercial aircraft, but then it is a battle work horse and no frills are required. You certainly don't get them where the toilet facilities are concerned and it was with some amusement I watched the construction of the chemical toilet and sparse curtain on the rear cargo ramp soon after takeoff on a brighter note however, it was a hell of a lot easier to negotiate this time than it was 25 years ago!

Airborne

Over the last couple of years it has been noticeable that the amount of females in high level positions within all three branches of the British Forces has increased, so it

was no surprise to see Flt Lt Lucie Purvis as co-pilot in the cockpit; Flt Lt Eden was our pilot for takeoff while Flt Master Weaver and Sgt Dan Ellis made up the flight deck

The Loadmaster, Sgt Matt Greensmith made sure everything was shipshape and orderly in the cabin while running a 'mini-Starbucks' from a tiny aperture near the flight deck. The smell of roasting coffee wasted around the aircraft mingling with a whiff of ... could that he Pot Noodles?

I arrived on the flight deck shortly after takeoff as we were climbing through 17,000 ft to an expected cruising height of 26,000.

The time spent at low level around South Georgia would be dependent on fuel consumption on the way South, the crew explained.

As we drew near to South Georgia and began the descent the battle of the gaudy orange survival/ immersion suit commenced. All passengers are required to wear them when flying at low level but they are not easy to get into and just as bad to get out of again.

Finally encased in a rubber suit designed for someone at least six feet tall with size 10 feet I waddled to the flight deck to catch my first glimpse of South Georgia.

South Georgia ahoy!

Soon, little white dots of icebergs were visible as we descended through the cloud and gradually, snow capped mountains dropping straight into the sea appeared.

The beautiful aqua shades of the sea surrounding the bergs was a colour that could never be reproduced and though the waves were turning in the sea there was a remarkably peaceful aura accompanying the view.

This illusion was immediately shattered on returning to the cabin where the rear cargo ramp had been lowered and the starboard parachute door was open.

A cold wind was howling in the door and everything suddenly seemed much more in keeping with the nature of the rugged landscape we were viewing. Standing in a blast of wind that had the power to blow me across the aircraft I decided that would probably feel a bit like that to stand on one of the snow splattered mountains. Becoming accustomed to the steady turbulence and the fierce wind I was beckoned to the side of the para door where

photographers were trying to get the best shot. Barely able to keep my eyes open and feeling like my nostrils were being ripped from face I managed to take some pictures, especially of the brave souls who were standing around the door with their faces somewhat distorted by the force of the wind, but grinning

The MPA photographer Mike Jones was stretched out on the floor and getting loads of scenic shots, so I concentrated on the view.

The Governor and Mrs Huckle were thoroughly enjoying the experience too and ensured that the viewing bubble situated above their seats in the cockpit was appreciated by as many as possible.

Mrs Huckle had climbed up into the bubble as pilot Lucie Purvis executed a tight turn in the entrance of Grytviken Bay, but soon scrambled down again deciding that it was just a little too unnerving to look down the wing at that angle.

Squalls were skirted to avoid the worst of the turbulence but the nature of the flight had its inevitable effect on some of the passengers and several faces above the delectable orange suits turned a sickly shade of

Homeward bound

While it was a most exhilarating day in the air, I felt a little sad as we gained height and set a course for the Falklands.

The icebergs seemed so small compared to my grandmothers pictures; there didn't seem to be enough snow and the glaciers stopped dead at the sea rather than bursting out into the pack-ice as I had imagined.

But that aside, it was an amazing sight to see and it almost felt that we were at the edge of the world, that there couldn't possibly be anything beyond.

There was once a community of more than 2,000 living on the Island at the height of the whaling operation, but now that is hard to imagine.

It seems to me that it is a place that should only be inhabited by those who really care about it and who are truly comfortable with themselves in very real isolation.

Wool market report

for October 17

THE Australian dollar fluctuated during the week but closed similar to last weeks close.

The Australian wool market AWEX indicator dropped to its lowest point of the season despite the low Aussie Dollar, down 29 cents this week to 839 cents.

In pence the AWEX is down a further 13p from £3.39 to £3.26

The lack of downstream demand- due to a possible protracted economic recession- is seen as the reason for the lack of interest.

The drop in wool prices despite a greatly reduced Australian Dollar is of great concern to wool growers everywhere.

Remember the Goose, the Stone-run and the Turkey men? Now meet... Sponge Woman

Falklands are often tagged with the name of their principal object of study

Since the first 'goose man' in the seventies, we have had a procession of what might at first appear to be heroes, or maybe villains, from the more gothic type of American comics, culminating re-cently in 'Worm girl.' Now, if the rule continues to apply, it is time to meet Sponge Woman

With the aid of a Shackleton Scholarship, Ulster Museum marine biologist, Claire Goodwin has begun diving in the shallows of Falklands waters in order to research sponges of the Islands.

Realising a lifelong ambition to dive in the South Atlantic through this sponsorship Claire said: "The sponges of the Falklands have been little studied and I'm sure there are some interesting discoveries to be made. I'm really grateful to the scholarship committee for giving me the chance to go.

"Sponges form a substantial and important component of the biodiversity in the Falklands but so far have not been adequately recorded. Sponge biodiversity is a good measure of environmental quality, with individual species



ing systems of pollution, temperature changes due to climate change and other types of environmental degradation

Claire will work with the Shal-Marine Survey Group (SMSG) participating in a diving expedition to the remote Jason Islands to collect sponge samples on the yacht the Golden Fleece. She will also train local scientists on sponge identification and ecol-

Karen Neely, SMSG project officer, who is working with Claire said: "Sponges are hard to identify and consequently we have very little knowledge of our sponge fauna. Working with Claire means we are getting some much needed information on this neglected

group of animals

Welcoming the research collaboration with SMSG, Bernard Picton, Curator of Marine Invertebrates at the Ulster Museum. said: "Claire's trip will gather some interesting new material for the museum's collections and build on our existing work on the sponges of Britain and Ireland. We're hoping it will lead to further research collaborations with SMSG in the future." PN/MP

Battle over 'Trojan Horse' phrase

BRITAIN'S Ambassador, John Sawers, was "gavelled quiet" on Monday, by Jorge Arguello of Argentina, Chairman of the Special Committee on Decolonisation "in a jam packed room in the UN's basement," according to a report by Matthew Russell Lee of *Inner City*

The UK and others were seeking to delete a qualifying phrase: "...and where there is no dispute over sovereignty," from a resolution concerning American Samoa. Anguilla, Bermuda, the British Virgin Islands, the Cayman Islands. Guam, Montserrat, Pitcairn, Saint Helena, the Turks and Caicos Islands and the United States Virgin

Although introduced by Indonesia, which, as chair of the C-24 group, chided the UK and others. including South Africa, for not having objected earlier in the so-called C-24 process, Spain and Argentina are thought to have been behind the introduction of the phrase, which was regarded by many as a "Trojan Horse" which could later also be applied to resolutions regarding the Falkland Islands and Gibraltar and would have the effect of limiting the key United Nations right to selfdetermination.

Ambassador Sawers warned that the United Nations would "tinker" at its peril, with principles like selfdetermination.

The UK amendment was passed, to 40, with 47 abstentions, after Brazil had called for a formal vote in the wake of a prolonged and often heated debate



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
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
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Graeme lights up the Fortuna sponsored golf competition

Ocean 8 cleaned but still leaking

70 tonnes of oil still unaccounted for, says Director of Fisheries

THE dive team on the MV Tasmai have recovered some 28 tonnes of fuel from the sunken trawler Ocean 8 and all the main tanks have been checked and either had fuel removed, or have been found not to contain fuel, said the Director of Fisheries John Barton.

The Ocean 8 is lying on her port side in Berkeley Sound where she sank after going on fire six months ago.

The MV Tasnui arrived on October 15, and the team onboard worked up to October 28. The oil recovery operation was commissioned and organised by the Ocean 8's insurers, The Korean Shipowners Mutual Protection and Indemnity Association.

The expected quantities of fuel were found and pumped from a number of the port side tanks, said Mr. Barton.

"The centre and starboard tanks were found not to contain fuel, or where fuel was present it was in much smaller volumes than anticipated."

One port side tank, which was expected to contain oil, was also found to be empty, a finding which was verified after entry by a diver

The oil recovery operation was monitored by fishery officers and personnel from the FPV *Protegat*. The quantity of fuel onboard the MV *Tasnui* was measured on arrival and at the end of the operation.

"This assessment of the quantity of fuel recovered closely matches the figures provided by the dive team," said Mr Barton, adding that the dive team appeared very capable and the oil recovery operation proceeded well, although the quantities of fuel anticipated were not encountered.

Some fuel leaked from the Ocean 8 at the time it sank on May 19, and prior to the operation to seal the main leaks. Since then there has been a minor oil slick emanating from the wreck. "It is difficult to know how much

fuel leaked from the Ocean 8 during that time, however there does appear to be some 70 tonnes of oil unaccounted for. Some of this may still be in the structure of the Ocean 8, and some of it has probably escaped into the environment," explained Mr Barton.

The dive team on the MV Tasnu have sealed up a number of openings on the Ocean 8. These include the eleven holes they made in tanks, as they extracted the fuel, five portholes and eleven vent pipes.

On the basis of the information provided from the dive team it is likely that the *Ocean 8* will continue to leak fuel at a slow rate for some time, but this should have a limited environmental impact, said Mr Barton.

Surveys of the shoreline and seabirds in Berkeley Sound, undertaken during the oil removal operation did not encounter any signs of oil, he concluded.

FIRS goes global

THE Falkland Islands Radio Service (FIRS) will soon be able to be heard by a worldwide audience.

The station's website, www.firs.co.fk, is due to begin streaming FIRS live this weekend. The first programme to be aired officially will be *The Fusion* on Saturday evening where host Stacy Bragger will be marking the launch of the new service with an exclusive interview with the Kaiser Chiefs.

In the near future, podeasts of a wide range of FIRS programmes will be available to download.

Station Manager Corina Bishop said this is a great way for people to keep in touch with happenings in the Falklands, especially those who have been away from the Islands for a long time.

Synergy Information Systems has been instrumental in ensuring that the streaming could go ahead, she said, adding that it could not have happened without the support and sponsorship of Cable and Wire-

Although Falklands Radio will initially not be online after the Lifestyles Programme finishes each weekday, the plan is to extend the hours in the near future.

Broadband goes rural

This week residents of Darwin and Goose Green have been upgraded to the new telecommunications network being installed by Cable and Wireless.

A number of residents in the Fitzroy Ridge area were also upgraded to the new network during the previous week.

Project Manager Paul Shelswell, said the new network offers broadband connectivity for the first time, in addition to providing a higher quality telephone service.

The first Camp Settlement to be upgraded was Fitzroy in April.

The residents of Port Howard and Fox Bay will be next for an upgrade which is planned to take place in early November.

Great news that more people outside Stanley have this week been linked to the new and improved system - the door that opens - but today we also lose our local operators for good - the door that closes.

All directory enquiries will now be directed to the overseas call centre so no more will you be able to ask for the number of someone by their nickname or be cheerily addressed by your own name when you ring 181. The latter impressed me for ages and made me feel special that I was so well known - then someone let the cat out of the bag and told me that the number of the phone you call from flashes up. Nevertheless the girls knew the numbers asked for so well, most of them were reeled of the top of their heads and I was surprised that they didn't greet me as 22707 on

Their local knowledge over the years has continued the legend of the telephone exchange operators pre 1982 who could quite often tell you if the person you were calling was home and then put you through to

wherever they were at the time.

While recent operators haven't enjoyed the vantage point of overlooking Ross Road, they were still extremely helpful where possible and well genned up on who was on call in the emergency services and the quickest way to make contact to ensure a speedy response to everyone's

One special call they pointed in the right direction, because of their local knowledge of family names, resulted in a friend of mine being put in touch with a family member she had longed to hear from for many years. Without the quick thinking operators, a mother might possibly never have had the opportunity to meet her daughter and spend quality time with her soon after the call was made. That sort of service is priceless.

While the new service might be adequate, it is slower, a cunning ploy to generate more revenue one wonders at 10p per minute. OAPs who use it regularly will undoubtedly notice an increase in their phone bills and it's no good trying to wheedle a number from a friendly watch keeper either as that personal touch has been whipped away by the management to ensure directory enquiries generates maximum revenue, regardless of the loss of quality in the service.

The cheery, rapid response we've enjoyed was part of our heritage and I think, a part of our culture, a piece of what makes the Falklands

special and personal.

Keep your phone book close to hand as all the information you will now receive from 181 is within its pages and despite its somewhat random and confusing layout it will be just as quick to refer to.

Royal British Legion's Falklands branch supporting the supporters

VISIT any of the 1982 battle sites or memorials in the Falklands, however far off the beaten track and the chances are that you will find a wreath or some of the familiar red poppies that most people have worn each October and November since childhood.

Whether on a war grave, a mountain top, San Carlos Water, or far out to sea, each wreath laying and act of Remembrance in the Falklands starts out with a specific request from a group or individual in the UK or elsewhere, but is carried out by a representative of the Falklands Branch of the Royal British Legion (RBL)

There can be few organisations more like an iceberg than the Royal British Legion, which launched its annual Poppy Appeal last week. Its public appearances on occasions of national remembrance, whether at village war memorials or London's Royal Albert Hall, are the iceberg's visible tip, with an annual cost of around £2 million, while the £43 million spent on welfare and care services is what lies beneath.

With some 400,000 members in Britain and 11,000 overseas, the Royal British Legion is one of the world's largest volunteer organisations and membership is open to men and women of all ages, whether or not they have a connection with the Armed Forces.

The Poppy Appeal and other public occasions of banners and wreath-laying, are all part of what the Legion calls its "Custodians of Remembrance" role and are mammoth undertakings in themselves the Legion's Poppy Factory in Richmond, London, produces over thirty million poppies and one hundred thousand wreaths each year but give no clue to the vast amount of work the Legion does behind the scenes, either providing welfare services for British ex-servicemen and their families directly, or lobbying the powers-that-be on their members' behalf.

The Legion is not, as many think, just about those who fought in two world wars, but also about caring for those involved in the many other conflicts since and their

dependents

One chilling fact, mentioned to Penguin News by Dave Lewis, Chairman of the local branch of the RBL, is that there has only been one year since the end of the second world war, when no British serviceman has been killed on active service.

The welfare aspect of the RBL extends even to the Falklands and can be available to ex-members of the Falkland Islands Defence Force as well as the regular British Forces.

Over the last three years, the Falkland Islands have raised £16,000 for the Poppy Appeal.

FIDC 25th anniversary party put on hold

PLANS to mark the 25th anniversary of the formation of the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) were firmly quashed by Board members at their meeting last week.

The purpose of the proposed celebrations was to remind stakeholders of the undoubted achievements of FIDC and to signal to previous and prospective clients that the corporation has the potential to support them in the future, said a report put before the board. Interim General Manager Tom Cosh, added that it was intended to recognise the success of clients, "not to puff up the corporation."

£4,711 had already been spent on corporate gifts, updated maps logo and flag, however the board did not support further funding of £5,000 for a celebration.

Chairman, Councillor Richard Cockwell said he thought it was a good idea to, "keep our head below the parapet at the moment," while Roger Spink added that it would be an embarassment at the moment, with the FIDC review incomplete and not being able to show where the corporation was headed.

It was agreed that the anniversary could be marked later in the year at a more appropriate time.

History students from Warwick make long distance school trip

PUTTING even the Community School pupil's overflight of South Georgia and the recent Infant and Junior School Football Club's visit to Chile in the shade, at least as far as distance travelled on a school trip goes, is a group of nine GCSE history students from Warwick School currently in the Falkland Islands.

Led by former Community School history teacher, Dominic Giles, they have visited Darwin, Pebble and Sea Lion Island and will all arrive in Stanley on Thursday ready for a battlefield tour on Friday.

Stanley travel agents, International Tours and Travel (ITT) have arranged the group's international flights on LAN and their Falklands programme. They also received Tour Leader Support from FITB.

Sally Ellis, of ITT commmented, "this is a completely new type of client for ITT and we are delighted to see the Falklands being used as school trip destination."

Long as the journey from Warwick to the Falklands is, this is maybe not a record for school trip length. Last season, a group of girls from an Edinburgh school visited South Georgia on a cruise ship as part of a school trip.

Court news

One year driving disqualification reduced

KEVIN Thomas, benefited from an early taste of Christmas spirit on Wednesday when a twelve month driving ban imposed on April 2, 2008, was reduced.

Mr Thomas, who works on the cross sound ferry, Concordia Bay, had applied to have the ban removed on the grounds that travelling to and from Newhaven by taxi to spend time with his partner in Stanley, would cost him around £400 each month.

After considering all the circumstances surrounding Mr Thomas's original conviction, including the level of alcohol recorded in his breath at the time, Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds said that while a driving disqualification was mandatory, she felt that a reduction in its length was appropriate in this case.

"With the approach of Christmas in mind," said the Senior Magistrate, the court would meet Mr Thomas halfway and he could have his licence returned on Monday December 15.

Driving offences admitted but no plea for assault charge

STANLEY man Ross Poole heard three charges against him in court on Wednesday, relating to events which took place on the evening of October 16.

Mr Poole pleaded guilty to having taken away a 110 Land Rover, without the owner's permission and to dangerous driving, resulting in serious damage to the vehicle, which was found upside down in a ditch on the Airport Road.

Although Mr Poole also pleaded guilty to a charge of ob-

structing the police, he entered no plea to the charge of assaulting a police officer.

This was a serious charge, said Mr Poole's defence counsel, Richard Marlor, who requested an adjournment of one week so that his client could prepare a plea in the light of papers on the case released to him by the police.

The prosecution had no objection, and the case against Mr Poole was adjourned until Wednesday November 5.

Further adjournments for cases awaiting trial

JASON Morris appeared in court to plead guilty to the two charges of assault and one of harassment brought against him last week.

Sentencing could not take place as Mr Morris had previously pleaded not guilty to a charge of occasioning actual bodily harm against his former partner, Patricia Paredes Villablanca, to whom the new charges also related.

Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds, acceded to a request for a further adjournment until November 12,

pending a pre-trial review, made by Mr Morris's defence counsel, Richard Marlor.

An adjournment for one week, pending a pre-trial review, was also sought by Crown Counsel, in the case against Charlotte McRae after Miss McRae pleaded not guilty to two charges of theft and one of attempted theft. Ms McRae, who is on unconditional bail, will also appear in court again on November 5.

News from Executive Council

Dairy for sale

AN extraordinary meeting of Executive Council (ExCo) was held last Thursday. In the absence from the Islands of councillors, Clausen, Summers and Rendell, the voting members of ExCo were councillors John Birmingham, Richard Stevens and Ian Hansen.

Cllr Birmingham said that there had been only a short agenda, with the principal business being to consider the decision of the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) to terminate its financial support of the Stanley Dairy.

Given the current financial climate, said Cllr Birmingham, ExCo had found no reason not to agree with the decision of the Development Board to cease any further public funding of the dairy, because, he said, "the business case was not strong enough to warrant a large input of taxpayers' money."

ExCo agreed with the Development Board that the dairy should in the first instance be offered for sale as a going concern, but if no suitable offers were put on the table, then it would be closed down.

In the meantime, he added, there was a small group looking into the way ahead for the dairy.

Fuel prices discussed

A "GENERAL discussion" about fuel prices was held at Executive Council last week, but was hampered by the absence from the country of the Manager of local fuel suppliers, Stanley Services Ltd.

Asked by Penguin News, if it was true that the formula for adjusting local retail fuel prices, in response to changes in the wholesale price, was applied on a monthly basis when wholesale prices were increasing, but only every quarter when they were falling, Cllr Birmingham said that he did not know, but reported that the Chief Executive had been tasked by ExCo to discuss, "various aspects of fuel pricing," with Stanley Services.

Tax information to be released to Policy Unit

FOR the purpose of gathering accurate statistics about the economy and on the understanding that the strictest confidentiality will apply, ExCo have agreed that the Taxation Department should be allowed to give information to the Government's Policy Unit.

Under the present legislation, the Governor has to give authority for this to happen and he has now done so, on the advice of Executive Council, said Councillor Birmingham.

Punta plans Antarctic gateway

AN international terminal exclusively for Antarctic travellers is planned for Punta Arenas Airport in 2010.

A report in La Prensa Austral states that the purpose of this nine million dollar project is to confirm Punta Arenas as the real gateway to Antarctica, a condition it disputes with Ushuaia in Argentine Tierra del Fuego.

The project is timed to coincide with the bi-centenary celebration of Chile's independence in 2010, which will be crowned by a massive public works programme extending throughout the country.

The responsibility of Chile's Public Works Ministry, the completely independent Antarctic terminal will have a floor area of 1,280 square meters.

Juan Francisco Miranda from the Airports Department said that basically four different aircraft fly to Antarctica with "an average passenger number of 128, concentrated from December to March," therefore the 1,280 square meters.

Mayor Eugenia Mancilla pointed out that the terminal is a first step to an, "Antarctic Agency," which will enable improved links with Antarctica, better airport facilities and, "prepare us for emergencies such as the one experienced last season when the Explorer went down."

Mr Miranda said that more than 1,200 people live in different Antarctic bases and stations, and require a pennanent logistics backup, which he was sure could be provide from Punta Arenas."

MoD protect the natural environment

THOUGH its title, Recycling and Waste Management News (RWMN) makes it sound like a guest publication on TV's 'Have I got News for You' programme, this week it carried an article which suggests that when it comes to waste disposal at least, the military establishment in the Falklands may be doing more to protect our natural environment than we do ourselves.

According to RWMN's Liz Gyekye, a waste management firm called, Veoila Environmental Services, has struck up a partnership with the Ministry of Defence's Disposal Services Author-

ity in the Falkland Islands, to help them manage the waste from the Mount Pleasant Complex and other military sites and protect the local environment.

The waste firm is identifying, recovering and transporting waste that cannot be treated on the islands. Veolia's staff have been providing this service since 2001 and are currently working on-site at the supply squadron unit in the Falklands to segregate, repackage and load shipping containers with waste such as paints, fuels and adhesives that require specialist disposal.

Your questions answered

Q IN what circumstances, if any, does FIG pay pensions to former contract officers no longer resident in the Islands?

If pensions are paid to former contract officers no longer in the Islands, how much do they cost FIG annually?

A The Pensions Office provided the following response.

Contract Officers working for FIG do not accrue pension rights, therefore there is no cost to FIG.

As reference has been made to "pensions" it should be noted that if a Contract Officer is liable to make, or has made, contributions under either of the state Schemes (ie the Old Age Pensions Ordinance 1952 or the Retirement Pensions Ordinance 1996) then they will receive a pension under the terms of the Ordinance applicable to them. The criteria to be eligible for a state pension is the same for every registered member irrespective of where they live.

Q WHATEVER happened to Saint FM, I havent been able to tune in for ages?

A KTV, providers of the service replied.

Unfortunately, due to a technical problem, which is beyond our control, Saint FM has been off the air for nearly one month.

We apologise to Saint FM listeners for this, but we would like to reassure them we are working on restoring Saint FM to what it was, just as soon as it is technically possible.

Thank you to the many people who have called and enquired about Saint FM. It certainly is a very popular radio station, not just with Saints keeping in touch with home, but also many locals love it too.

Q HOW much is it costing FIG/ FIDC to keep Tamar alongside the East jetty?

A Tim Cotter of FIDC provided the following information.

The cost of keeping the Tamar alongside East Jetty until the sale was complete was factored into the price which was approved by Exco.

The monthly cost is around £6,800 which covers our legal obligations to maintain the ship.

This figure does not include variable costs like electricity and water.

FIDB: concern that business appraisals are not objective, despite assurances

THE Development Corporation is still not operating in an objective way where loan administration and appraisal is concerned, said Board Member Roger Spink at the latest meeting of the Board on Friday.

Mr Spink said he wanted it minuted that it was his opinion that objective appraisals were not being provided, despite assurances having been given at the previous meeting.

On August 5, a report was presented to the Board regarding proposed changes to the loan administration procedures of FIDC.

The report presented five main objectives: identification of a suitable software package to manage the loan book, development of a loan administration procedure, document and standardised loan appraisal and review process, the formulation of a loan policy document to provide a framework on which to base loan decisions and conditions and a detailed review of the current loan book.

The interim Financial Controller Frank Maloney said a substantial part of the objectives had been completed and the report now sought to update the Board and for it to formally adopt the new policies and procedures.

The Internal Auditor, Rob Granger, however, flagged up that policies could not be implemented before being approved by Executive Council and it was agreed that the Interim General Manager of the Corporation, Tom Cosh should meet with the Attorney General's Department to take legal advice.

Penguin News asked Mr Spink what his main concerns were with the way loans were administrated and appraised.

"The lack of consistent, objective and proper appraisal of applications, as they are currently presented to the Board, makes it difficult for Board members to have confidence that any decisions they take are based on sound facts," said Mr Spink.

"In dealing with public funds this is clearly of concern Despite the report and review, the changes required had not been implemented for the last FIDC meeting," he added.

Co-op: due procedures continued

THE decision to close the Stanley Co-operative Society, taken by members at a General Meeting in mid-August, was followed by a statutory two month period to allow for objections.

No objections to the decision having been lodged, according to Co-operative Society Chairman, Malcolm Ashworth, the next step will be for the Registrar General to formally withdraw the company's registration as a cooperative. Once this has been done, a liquidator will

be appointed by the Registrar General, who will be responsible for the final winding up of the company and the disposal of its assets.

Mr Ashworth said the Committee were still approachable and that some sales of stock items from the Co-op had continued to take place. He also continued that there had been what he described as "some slight interest"—shown in acquiring the premises.

There are however to be three Dash 7 flights through Mount Pleasant Airport this season; a trial flight in November, with two more planned in the New Year


The BAS ship calls to the Falklands this season will almost be at the usual level.

Overcharged for slow internet speeds

FOR an awfully long time download speeds on the Cable and Wireless dial up service have been extremely low at around 2 -

Very recently, after much head scratching and many trials, the speed was upped to an amazing 40kbps. It was not long until I discovered this was "on island" speed only and any "off Island" browsing fell away to nothing and

tripped out.

I recently had cause to update my anti-virus programme which contained 12Mb of information. Attempting to download this programme we started at 3.2kbps which slowly dwindled away to less than 2kbps before tripping out. Second attempt was the same. All the while of course we are paying 6p a minute. At 2kbps it would take 100 minutes to download this programme. Every

time it trips out we have to start again at the beginning and there is no chance of staying on line for that amount of time.

I have recently been offered an upgrade to Broadband with a saving of £20 to activate the line if I sign up now. When I asked what it would include, the only quote I could get was, "up to 256kbps for the Bronze package, up to 512kbps for the Silver and 1024kbps for the Gold package." These rates of down-load are of course, "on Island" and there is little I would want to surf "on Island" - but no one will give me a minimum speed for down load "off island" nor a minimum speed "on Island" for that matter.

I suppose 2kbps is legally within the range of "up to 256kbps" but it is expensive

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Out of my window

A column in which Inspector Len McGill of the Royal Falkland Islands Police takes an occasional look outside as the new prison and station renovations take shape...

A QUIET confidence emanated from the workmen as the first floor/ceiling slab pour began.

As they toiled, a great grey monster inched its way from the south end of the slab toward its northern edge, as load after load of ready mix concrete slopped onto the form work. It oozed into the reinforcing steel structure, embracing it, even as it appeared to consume it. Once the decision to start had been made, everything was driven by the needs of the concrete.

I am sure that there were many thoughts running through the workmen's heads as they started pouring tonnes of ready mix concrete onto the formwork, so painstakingly erected over the previous week. Great care had been taken to provide sufficient support but the worry about a sudden failure of any part of it, must have been at the forefront of everyone's mind. Controlling such quantities of very heavy liquid material, almost two and a half metres in the air, requires attention to detail. Spreading, vibrating and tamping had occurred in what appeared to me to be a very smooth operation. The main pour was completed with surprising speed.

Within two hours, half the prison area had been covered by a concrete ceiling and I could look out onto a smooth concrete floor. I have reported in the past strange behaviours appearing among the workmen. As the newly poured slab of concrete enslaved the workers and demanded their constant attention, I noticed how they worked quietly, continually caressing the slabs surface with their trowels as they worked its edges against the formwork.

As the day drew on, the surface texture changed as the concrete cured. Whilst I was observing this, I was astounded to see the prostrate form of a man gliding past my window, his right arm outstretched with its hand firmly grasping a steel float. He was elevated above the surface of the slab

and "proceeding in a southerly direction," as we say in the police service. I leapt to my window to better see this 'superman' phenomenon.

I was disappointed however, as this was no sudden breakthrough in human transportation, but a man, now 'Neiling', on a wooden pallet, suspended by slings from the telescopic arm of a fork lift. This provided an ingenious solution to the lack of all round access to the slab, caused by the east wall of the old police station. The workman could be precisely positioned over the slab to enable him to float off its entire surface. This was completed leaving behind a very pleasing flat finish without wrinkles, bubbles or float marks. It also provided the opportunity for observers to comment on the demonstration of a 'suspended sentence'!

The weather assisted the curing process and following strength testing of test blocks of the concrete used, the formwork and supporting structure was removed. Job successfully completed, congratulations to all involved.

the experience and practice gained from the west slab. Steel reinforcing is being prepared and familiar patterns are appearing. I look forward to the appearance of this final ceiling/floor slab in the coming weeks.

How do you test the strength of concrete? I hear you ask. Small blocks prepared from the concrete batches and allowed to cure for a given period of time are subject to applied force in a device designed to crush them. It measures the amount of force, in Newtons, applied to the concrete block at the point of failure. One Newton is the amount of force required to give a 1-kg mass an acceleration of 1 m/s/s.

It's Monday October 27, and from my window I have noticed the start of a block wall which may lead to my 'walling up'. To take my mind of this impending fate I will ponder various mathematical equations, including:

l Newton=lkg*m

idea for the tour arose from a casual conversation between him and two of the Infant and Junior School Football Club coaches, Steve Tooby and Dustin Gilson-Clarke.



THE Australian wool market AWEX indicator had it biggest weekly drop in five years, down to its lowest point in two years.

cents this week to 764 cents.

The fluctuating exchange rate is encouraging people to not bid for wool and commit, as well as a probable lack of downstream demand due to global financial issues.

As might be expected pass in rates are very high with one third of the wool passed in at auction.

The apparently steady drop in wool prices, however they are looked at, is of great concern to wool growers everywhere.

Now in its fifth season of operation, the Pod Gift Shop has grown in to a retail success story – supplying locals, military, and visitors with original gifts and souvenirs hand-crafted here in the Falklands.


The Pod is the inspiration of Patrick Berntsen and Pat Pratlett, the couple having spotted a gap in the market for locally-produced goods in 2003. Their initial range included wood and leather items, pebble jewellery, knitted hats, and assorted felted goods. Today they sell a huge variety of products from more than 45 local suppliers, with new items arriving weekly. Many of these are one-offs hand-made by Falkland Islanders, while other items (such as Paragon House Fudge) appeal to those with a sweet tooth.

Conveniently located in the centre of town, the Pod forms the lower-half of the Old Philomel Store, it's yellow

walls and gaily-painted shutters a distinctive local landmark much photographed by visitors and international media. Despite the central location, Patrick concedes the first year of operation

was a struggle, particularly once the tourist season had ended. However the turning point for the business came when he spotted a UK advertisement for a sublimation printer – technology that would allow the business to transfer images on to items like coffee mugs, place mats, magnets and bags.

Having made the commitment to travel to the UK to purchase the equipment and undertake training, Patrick reports the investment has long since paid for itself, with custom print jobs for individuals and companies now the most popular part of the business. Word of mouth has also been a key part of the Pod's success, pushing up demand for Falkland Islands



memorabilia amongst visiting military. Those not able to visit Stanley are also catered for, with Patrick visiting MPA each Saturday.

Patrick can transfer any image, logo or message on to an endless list of products, using either original photos, or digital images supplied on memory stick or CD. Orders received during the week are usually available within 24 hours – whilst weekend and bulk orders take a little longer.

With the cruise ship season kicking off

this week and Christmas just a matter of weeks away, Patrick and Pat are embarking on their busiest period — often working late in the night and all weekend just to keep the shop stocked with best sellers. The business

also employs an indispensable team of part-time staff, without whom Patrick and Pat readily admit they could not cope during the peak period.





Top dog Leo in drugs bust

TWO men appeared in court on Monday faced with the charge of illegally importing 30.06 kilograms of cocaine into the Falklands.

The Class A drug was discovered on board the fishing vessel Ventura following a routine, random check by the Immigration Department and an RAF Police dog and is estimated to have a street value of £1million.

Principal Crown Counsel Ros Cheek told the court that the men had worked on the Falklands flagged Ventura for only one season and that their seamen discharge books showed that they had frequently changed vessels and employers in recent years, but it was believed they had worked together for a number of years.

The drug was initially detected in the cabin and sleeping area of forty-one year old Rogelio Curras Pastoriza by the RAF police dog Leo and a further search revealed 29 packets of the substance under the bunk of Jesus Carbullo Martinez (26).

Mr Carbullo, who was represented by lawyer David Lang, pleaded guilty to the charge, while Mr Curras opted to obtain legal representation before making a plea.

Ms Cheek said that in police interview Mr Curras had given a number of different accounts,

however, in the most recent he had admitted possessing and importing the 1kg block of cocaine discovered in his quarters.

Mr Carbullo, however, had given a full account of what appeared to have happened. He told police that he and Mr Curras had obtained all 29 packages in a brothel in Montevideo and that both men had carried them on board in two lots and placed them in Mr Curras's wardrobe. They were to be paid 20,000 Euros to take the packages to Spain. Continued on page 3.

New Constitution approved by Her Majesty the Queen

FALKLANDS history was made this week when the Falkland Islands Constitution Order 2008 was made by Her Majesty the Queen in the Privy Council on Wednesday.

It is expected to come into operation on January 1 2009, and is welcomed by representatives of both the British and Falkland Islands governments.

Commenting on the new Constitution, Councillor Mike Summers, spokesperson for the Falkland Islands' Government said it more accurately described the relationship between the Falklands and the United Kingdom, and formally established the degree of internal self-government.

"We have been pleased with the co-operative nature of our negotiations, reflecting a maturing partnership and a continuing commitment to security, social and economic development. The right of the people of the Falkland Islands to determine their political future has been freely exercised through the democratic process," he said.

Foreign Office Minister, Gillian Merron, said she welcomed the new Constitution for the Falkland Islands. "In agreeing it, the UK Government and the Falkland Islands' Government have worked together, openly and constructively, to ensure that it will serve the Islands well in the future.

"I was particularly pleased that all Falkland Islanders had opportunity to discuss and comment on it at all stages before it was finalised," she said.

The world has moved on since the previous Falkland Islands' constitution came into operation in 1985, and the Falklands have developed considerably, both economically and socially, said Ms Merron, adding that the new Constitution reflects this.

"It enhances local democracy, while retaining sufficient powers for the UK government to protect UK interests and to ensure the overall good governance of the territory. It provides for greater transparency and accountability through the creation of a Public Accounts Committee and a Complaints Commissioner. And the Rights chapter has been brought up to date to bring it into line with international agreements.

However it does not change the UK government's overall commitment to the Islands as an Overseas Territory, "nor does it change the right to self-determination, fundamental to our relationship with all of our Overseas Territories," she concluded.

Fuel prices not set to fall

THE fact that fuel prices are not falling at the pump in line with global prices is the result of a decision taken by the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) not to pass the full increase onto the public and the strength of the pound against the dollar, Stanley Services Manager Robert Rowlands said this week. As a result, a debt had been incurred, which now had to be repaid, he added.

While Mr Rowlands would not reveal the extent of the debt, he said it was a, "considerable sunt" of money and he could not set a time limit on when the debt would be repaid and when any significant decrease in pump prices would occur.

Mr Rowlands stated that the Company has a contract with the Falkland Islands Government that the Company has to carry a minimum of three months stock of each product. This meant that local prices are slower to rise and slower to fall when compared to international markets, as the stock is revalued after purchases made by the Company.

Kerosene and petrol are currently purchased in pounds and the cost of stock is revalued monthly and the price changed, according to the costing of the fuel from the suppliers. Diesel is purchased in American dollars and whilst the product price has seen a rapid fall from the highs experienced in July, the pound against the dollar has fallen by approximately 20% in the same period, which has reduced the price reduction in Falkland pound costs.

When the fuel prices were rising rapidly, the Falkands Government asked the Company that the full price increases on products should not be passed on to the customer at that time. This resulted in the build up of a debt that will have to be repaid and, along with the weakened pound, will slow the price reductions at the pump. Diesel was decreased in price by 2p per litre on November 1.

AS the news that a considerable amount of a substance believed to be cocaine had been discovered on a fishing vessel in Falklands waters filtered around town it has been interesting to observe public opinion on the final outcome of the bust and the prosecution presently underway

There has been much admiration for the services involved and of course for the lovely RAF police dog Leo and his handler who discov-

ered the first traces of the offending substance. Great job.

However, over the last couple of days there has been a slight shift in mood as the cost of the prosecution and possible imprisonment for the accused is considered. It's an indication of how politically involved and in touch with the Falklands financial situation the average man on the

If the two Spanish men are given a custodial sentence and bearing in mind that one has pleaded guilty to the offence it is more than likely to happen, then there will inevitably be considerable costs to be met by

the Falkland Islands Government.

While I know it couldn't happen at a worse time economically, I find myself having to take the moral high ground on this one and say that if the removal of that 30kg of cocaine from the system has saved some human suffering and absolute misery then it is worth it. At the other end of the scale it's an illegal toy for the rich and famous and a means for the less discerning to obtain wealth through other's misfor-

It's a disgusting trade and there are no scruples involved about who it is sold to. The younger the addict the more money can be extracted out of them over their lifetime. We are incredibly fortunate that we don't have to worry about our youngsters being approached when some are at their most vulnerable, that as they go through the agonies of growing up, there is not some unscrupulous swine waiting to offer them a little something to help them cope.

The cost of imprisonment for drug offenders may be significant to the government and therefore to the tax payer but think how proud we can be that we not only sing the song about zero tolerance to drugs but

can do the dance too.

There are indications that the fishing industry has been recognised for many years as a drug route into Europe and the Falklands is a part of it. That doesn't make me feel good and like others I can't help but wonder how much has gone through undetected and that we have possibly been seen as an easy touch.

The Royal Falkland Islands Police have tried for years to have a full time drugs detection dog, but there never seemed to be the equivalent

motivation within the councils for it to come to fruition.

While Leo is thought to be around for quite some time, this latest incident must surely prove that it is essential to have a dog at all times, a cheap deterrent who wouldn't cost as much as a prisoner to keep on a daily basis.

However, while I heap lavish praise on the silky, golden Labrador with the soft brown eyes, don't forget the Immigration Department and both the Royal Falkland Islands and Military Police; they deserve to bask in the glory too for putting a spanner in the works of a small part of the international drug trafficking industry

Missile firing, and straight talking

A LONG morning with apparently nothing very much happening, except posing by king penguins and egg-sitting by gentoos, brought forth some positive improvements in civil-military relations this week.

Monday morning found Penguin News participating in a strange mobilisation involving three members of Legislative Council, the Commander of British Forces South Atlantic Islands (CBFSAI), the Civilmilitary Liaison Officer, other officers including at least one colonel, photographers, representatives of the Environmental Planning Committee, the General Manager of the Tourist Board, the Officer Commanding the Falkland Islands Defence Force, representatives of govemment departments and several other interested folk, both civilian and military

In three groups, all the above were ferried out, either by Land Rover or boat, to three different vantage points from which they could observe the planned live firing of missiles from the range at

Port Harriet.

Although the missile firing range at Port Harriet has been used by British forces since 2005, in July this year it came under the scrutiny of the Environmental Planning Department, after objections were received that it lacked proper planning permission and that its continued use posed a threat to the tranquility of the penguin colony at Bluff Cove Lagoon, which is now an important destination for cruise

Following the meeting, planning

of the range at Port Harriet on a one-off basis in order to facilitate independent observation and thorough impact assessment.

It was observation of the first of two days planned for missile firing last week that caused Monday's

exodus from Stanley.

In the event, technical difficulties delayed the firing of the first missile by several hours and very strong north-westerly winds prevented any sound reaching observers at Bluff Cove Lagoon and East

The positive result of these delays was that the CBFSAI, Air Commodore Gordon Moulds, who had been manfully trying to conceal his mounting frustration at the lack of activity, was able at last to take refuge in the Bluff Cove Lagoon's cosy Seacabbage Café and spend some time in conversation with part owner, Hattie Kilmartin.

Having been leader of opposition to the range, which is currently operated by the Resident Rapier Battery from 16 Regiment Royal Artillery, Hattie emerged from talks with the Air Commodore, "very reassured," according to husband and fellow landowner, Kevin Kılmartın.

It was "tremendous" said Kevin that there had been this opportumity for direct talking. He and Hattie fully understood the need for training and had welcomed the assurance from the CBFSAI that the range would be used simply for that and not for simulated war fare, with the consequent risk of low-flying jets over the penguins.

BAS returns on the first of three trial flights



FALKLANDS airspace welcomed a British Antarctic Survey (BAS) Dash 7 aircraft back for the first time this season, when it undertook the first of three trial flights into Mount Pleasant.

The trial flight went very well operationally from the BAS point of view, a spokesperson confirmed, adding that they will be reviewing the logistic aspects and discussing any lessons learned with MPA col-

The BAS visit was timely as they were also able to assist the military by running a special Dash 7 flight to King George Island to pick up a compassionate case from HMS Endurance.

A police spokesperson said that after the initial find by the dog, a further human search was carried out by Customs officers and the Police with added manpower from the Military Police to ensure the operation was carried out succesfully

Commenting on the operation, Commander of British Forces, Air Commodore Moulds said he was very pleased that the forces were able to respond to the request for assistance. "Air Dog Leo and his handler Corporal Carver played a pivotal role in this outstanding joint operation which resulted in the seizure of the cocaine valued at over f Imillion

"This marks the team's second live find in the Falklands and is testimony to the first rate training conducted at the Defence Animal Centre and highlights the effectiveness of the specialist search teams,

Chief Police Officer, Paul Elliott, said he was absolutely delighted with the seizure of the cocaine, which demonstrated effective joined up working and the excellent relationships between Customs and Immigration, JSPSU and the Royal Falkland Islands Police.

Collector of Customs Robert King reiterated the sentiment saying that he commended his team on a job well done.

"This seizure has also confirmed our suspicions and fears that drugs are transiting through the Falklands from South America to European markets, in this case on a locally registered vessel," said Superintendent Elliott.

The fact that a JSPSU drugs dog is currently available was a real bonus, but we do need to seriously consider our response to this drug trafficking route in future.

This incident strengthens the case for our own locally based drug detection dog, not only to provide a lasting and effective deterrent to this evil trade, but also to resist the encroachment of drug related activity on the Islands.



Mayor of Gosport meets Argentine vets

THREE Argentine veterans of the 1982 Falklands War were recently received in his official parlour by the Mayor of Gosport, Councillor Derek Kimber

A former naval man, Mr Kimber was aboard HMS Coventry on May 25 1982, when it came under fire and was sunk with the loss of 19 lives.

Prompted by this first-hand experience of the effects of the horrors of war on both combatants and their families. Mr Kimber has since become involved in the welfare of Falklands veterans and followed the example of his predecessor as Mayor of Gosport by making the Falkland Veterans Foundation one of his chosen charities.

The Mayor's visitors, two former soldiers and one sailor, all conscripts in 1982, are currently touring Britain to find out about veterans welfare in the UK, in order to take back any new ideas which they can implement to improve the lives of veterans in Argentina.

Jose Luis Cappuros, main expertise is coordinating healthcare for veterans, whilst Jose Maria Raschia specialises in treating post traumatic stress disorder.

Julio Rodolfo Aro, the senior of the three men, is on the National Committee for the Programme for Veterans from War. His primary role is the welfare of veterans and their families.

Rumours that there had been a recent miscalulation by Stanley Services on the price of kerosene unfounded, said Rowlands. The price of this product is reviewed monthly and adjusted according to the cost of purchases made, this product was increased by 2 pence per litre on November 1.

Petrol prices remained unchanged on 1st November.

Mr Rowlands advised that the Falklands Government Internal Auditor does an annual review of the fuel formula to ensure that the Company is meeting its contractual agreement with the Falkland Government.

Phyl Rendell, Director of Minerals and Agriculture attended the International AAPG (American Association of Petroleum Geologists) in Cape Town, South Africa.

Cape Town is a key destination for petroleum geologists that have an interest in oil potential in the South Atlantic, said Mrs Rendell, adding that both BHP Billiton and Arcadia Petroleum Limited have licences in offshore southern Africa, as well as in the Falklands and there is potential to link exploration activities.

Meetings were held with Rockhopper Exploration and Borders & Southern Petroleum during the event and the stand attracted attention from a number of other oil company representatives interested in

"Although there is much uncertainty about global demand for oil, it was made clear at the Convention that the Falklands remains a place of interest and potential investment for oil companies and some industry representatives commented that rigs may become less costly and more readily available as a result."

Court news

Presentence report for Ross Poole

ADMITTING that there was, "not a lot to say" in mitigation of his client's actions on the night of October 16, Richard Marlor, acting for Ross Poole of Stanley, said that while a custodial sentence might seem to be appropriate given the seriousness of an assault on a police officer, he hoped that the court could accept this had not been a deliberate act, but had arisen from what his client admitted was his "general belligerence" and "drunken stupidity.

On November 5, Mr Poole, had admitted charges of taking away a vehicle without permission and without insurance and to a charge of assault against a Police officer.

The court was told that the assault had occurred in the Police Station. Mr Poole had earlier been taken into custody on suspicion of having been the driver of a Land Rover, discovered upside down in a ditch on the Airport Road, at about 9,40pm.

Described as, 'clearly intoxicated' when arrested, Mr Poole had been very aggressive and abusive towards PC Ford, refusing to sign the custody book or submit to a breathalyser test and demanding to be allowed to smoke.

While being escorted back to

his cell, after being allowed into the yard for a cigarette, Crown Counsel Elliott Taylforth said that Mr Poole had struggled, in the course of which he had elbowed PC Ford in the eye.

Mr Marlor told the court that when sober the following day, his client had been both totally cooperative with the police and apologetic for his actions.

Subsequent to his release from custody, Mr Poole had agreed with the owner to purchase the vehicle for £5,500, this being the mutually agreed estimate of its full value, prior to the damage caused in the incident.

Although its delivery had been delayed on the advice of his lawyer, the court was told that Mr Poole had written a letter of apology to PC Ford, which had now been sent

Noting that Mr Poole was now seeking the help of the Community Welfare Officer for problems relating to depression, alcohol abuse and gambling, Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds, agreed to a request for a pre-sentencing report on Mr Poole from the Social Welfare Department, setting as his only condition of bail that he should cooperate fully with them.

Expensive night out for navy men

TWO members of the crew of HMS Iron Duke paid dearly for a night out in Stanley this week.

Luke Swainston was fined £1,425 and James Morrison £500 after both pleaded guilty to taking away a Land Rover belonging to Raymond Poole, without his consent, on the night of October 23. Mr Swainston also admitted drink driving, driving without a licence and driving without insurance.

Damages to the Land Rover and to a garage, amounting to £575, were awarded against the pair, to be paid by each in equal parts.

Prosecuting, newly-arrived Crown Counsel, Mr Elliott Taylforth, said that after having spent some hours drinking in the Globe Tavern in the afternoon, the pair had later gone to Deano's Bar, which they are believed to have left shortly before closing time.

Having become separated from their companions and on coming across Mr Poole's vehicle in John Street, with the keys in the ignition, Mr Swainston got behind the wheel and drove off at high speed, with Mr Morrison in the passenger seat.

The vehicle was later seen to drive across several junctions without stopping at stop signs and was ultimately discovered to have backed into a garage on Hebe Street, causing considerable damage, both to itself and to the building.

One curious aspect of the case, as reported by Mr Taylforth, was that the removal of the vehicle had been spotted by a group of children, who reported it to the police and later conducted their own search to discover where the Land Rover went.

Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds, said that the possibility of a custodial sentence had been given real consideration, but that she had been persuaded that both defendants had acted out of character and were genuinely remorseful. She was also aware that the two sailors would now be subject to naval disciplinary proceedings and that the matter was not over for them

Further pre-trial review scheduled

THE case against Charlotte MacRae, who has pleaded not guilty to charges of theft and attempted theft, was adjourned once again in court on Wednesday November 5, though it is moving closer to trial, when it is expected that a number of witnesses will be called for both the defence and the prosecution.

Ms McRae's defence lawyer, Richard Marlor, assured the court that a defence statement would be ready before November 12, the date fixed by the Senior Magistrate for Ms MacRae's next court appearance.

Your questions answered

O AVIATION security in the United Kingdom and many other countries around the world insists that in the event of a passenger checking in hold baggage and then failing to check in for the actual flight requires the baggage belonging to that passenger to be removed from the aircraft prior to its departure.

Why is it then that announcements made concerning the airbridge departures from the Falkland Islands state that in such circumstances the baggage is likely to arrive at the planned destination without the passenger? Is this breaking the rules laid down by the UK Department of Transport or are airbridge flights subject to a different set of guidelines?

A San Lar Edmonds provided the following information in response to this question.

This is correct, procedures have become very stringent following both Lockerbie in 1988 and 9/11, 2001. The Mount Pleasant International Airport Security Programme has a full and comprehensive policy (which emulates the National Air Security Programme (NASP)) and states: "No bag shall be accepted for processing as an unaccompanied bag unless the bag was previously assigned to a flight and the person has travelled.

This is to facilitate corrective action in the event of a bag failing to reach its destination, either through not making it to the aircraft or accidentally being offloaded at Ascension Island. In the event of a passenger no show, then bags would indeed have to be offloaded from the aircraft.

There are no "announcements" made regarding such matters; however, there used to be an internal military "Airbridge check-in infor-mation sheet" which at the base stated: "Passengers are reminded to check the closed door list displayed in 12 Fac reception /air terminal to confirm their replacement is on the flight before they check in. Failure to do so may result in your baggage getting home before you do!

This statement has been removed from the sheet as it could have been misinterpreted; however, by way of explanation, military personnel are often required to pack up personal items for onward travel whilst vacating their room prior to the arrival of their successor. These items are then moved, not as baggage but as freight. In a rather blunt way of reminding individuals not to check in these personal items/ freight in advance of their successor's confirmation, the aforementioned statement was added. This was not in reference to checked in hold baggage which, as previously highlighted, would indeed have to be removed from the aircraft prior to its departure.

Although military flights are exempt from NASP, our own regulations still comply with UK Department for Transport requirements.



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

Betty Josephine Biggs 1929 - 2008

A lady of quiet determination, kindness and humour

BETTY Biggs born in Stanley on August 29, 1929, died on September 17, 2008 after a long illness

Betty Josephine Rowlands grew up with her elder brother John and younger brother Harold at 8 Ross Road East. Their parents were Theodore Conrad 'Con' Rowlands and Lucy née Larsen. Her paternal grandparents were Swedish Captain Rylander, who changed his name to Rowlands, and his Scottish wife. Her maternal grandparents were from Norway and England.

In common with many Stanley families of that period when wages were very low there were no luxuries and the children did part time jobs from an early age. Betty, like her brothers, was an able pupil but a rebellious one. She resisted all her teachers' attempts to force her to change from left to right handed with the stubborn determination that was a strong character trait throughout her life. On leaving school she did domestic work for the Dixon family for ten shillings a month.

At sixteen she was able to leave home, when she was employed as an auxiliary nurse at the hospital and housed in the nurses' quarters. Later she regaled her family with many hair-raising tales of learning on the job and soon finding herself the sole staff member on night duty, with strict instructions only to wake the sister or matron sleeping on the premises in the most extreme emergency. The hospital was very busy with many patients being treated for tuberculosis and the whole range of other ailments. She told many humorous tales of fellow nurses vving for the attention of their more handsome patients

While nursing Betty met and married Basil Biggs, recently returned from WW2 service in the RAF in India and Burma and now working as hospital caretaker. They lived first with his parents and then in 'Pink Cottage' a near derelict house in front of the hospital. From there they moved to the relative luxury of a small semidetached house on Allardyce Street with their three children, Janet (1948), Coleen (1949) and Peter (1951). Their fourth child Pauline was born in 1967 on board HMS Lynx to which Betty had been transferred from RMS Darwin en route to Stanley from South Geor-

An opportunity came for Basil to become policeman/handyman in South Georgia, then one of the Falkland Islands Dependencies. This move meant better pay and housing, so in early 1954 the family left on the old wood clad John Biscoe for what was to be Basil and Betty's home for nearly sixteen years.

As one of a handful of women on the island Betty had to put all her skill and imagination to work keeping three small children fed. clothed and schooled. The last was probably most difficult because it was hard to obtain appropriate books and the children had many exciting distractions.

Betty's quiet kindness and humour was remembered by many who spent time on the island. They made friends among the whalers and in later years Betty was surrounded by souvenirs of those days, including a frequently used brass cribbage board made by the blacksmith and other handmade mementoes. She also built up a large collection of stamps and later of Falklands and South Georgia books.

During those years Betty put her interest in philately to good use and began to fill orders from specialist dealers and collectors in London. A few years after their return to Stanley, Betty was employed part time by Postmaster Henry Luxton to process specialist stamp orders. Business grew and when the Philatelic Bureau was set up, she worked full time.

She loved her work and after 1982 it included the bonus of trips to South Georgia to release new stamp issues. She loved sea travel and would return happy, in spite of blisters on her hands from hours of hand franking. Unfortunately her philatelic career ended with her enforced early retirement in a financial panic when a handful of experienced older FIG employees, not yet retirement age, were replaced by school leavers.

Always politically aware, Betty was alarmed when, at the time that a leaseback arrangement with Argentina was being mooted, a councillor returning from a trip to West Falkland said that most people were in favour. Believing that this was not the case in Stanley, Betty and a friend went

door to door asking whether people favoured leaseback. Most people were keen to express their opinion apart from one young man who was very rude and a couple of ladies who felt that they had to ask their husbands what they thought! The response, an almost unanimous 'no', was passed to Governor Rex Hunt but they never heard what the Foreign Office made of it.

The leaseback debate was soon overtaken by the war in '82. She made it her business to ensure that future governors knew her views. One former governor remembers

with pleasure a neat pincer movement executed at a Government House function when Betty, and another great patriot Veima Malcolm, left the visiting very senior Foreign Office official in no doubt about many Islanders' views on the Argentine question.

In recent years Betty's house, with the union flag painted on the roof, became a regular stop for Ronnie Spafford's philatelic group tours. Each year she also entertained old South Georgia hands and ex FIDS who passed through, many as passengers or lecturers on cruise vessels. She also loved folk nights in the pubs and would always receive a phone call from Jock and Liz when one was planned. She served on the South Georgia stamp committee planning new issues and was a mine of information on South Georgia and Falklands people and events.

Widowed in 1987, Betty is survived by four children, eight grandchildren and two great grandchildren. Exercising her grandmother's rights she spoiled her eight grandchildren whenever she could. They always had in their granny, a patient listener and mischievous coconspirator, who gave them unconditional love. An added joy in her last years was the arrival of her two great grandchildren. It is to be hoped that they are old enough to remember their extraordinary and beloved 'Granny Betty', By Jan Cheek.

Of paras and poppies

YOU are probably reading this as Remembrance Day approaches, and you may well be wearing a

poppy.

The Poppy Appeal was launched this year by troops in Basra, reminding us that, increasingly, the money raised helps victims of our recent and current wars. All the signs are, however, that no reminder was necessary.

A few days ago, the Second Battalion the Parachute Regiment returned from Helmand. Their battle group lost 15 men in combat with the Taliban. As I watched the young men being warmly and emotionally welcomed back to Colchester, I was reminded of the sacrifice the same battalion made at Goose Green and Darwin in 1982. Fighting their way across that narrow and naked isthmus. they suffered 17 killed in the space of about 24 hours,

I wonder if the short and intense nature of the Falklands battle may have been easier to tolerate than the long drawn-out combat of Helmand. During the sixmonth posting, they would never have known when their forward operating bases would come under attack, or when a patrol would be ambushed.

What I know is that our loved veterans of the Second World War are slipping away, and they are being replaced by new generations of heroes. Fortunately Britain

Out of Africa

Mention of the Congo never fails to generate within me the twin emotions of horror and guilt. Horror because of the poverty, pestilence and apparently endless war: guilt because I never learned much about the region beyond that which I gleaned from my copy of Tin Tin in the Congo. (It was not as good as Tin Tin in Tibet and nothing can beat The Castaftori Emerald.)

Now, however, I am having to learn about the real Congo fairly quickly, if only to write about it with some degree of knowledge. The conflict has got much worse. and TV news teams are on the scene streaming back images of terror on the faces of Congolese women and children. By general agreement, we must now, as they say, "do something"

It is not clear yet, what that means. But the embryonically youthful Foreign Secretary David Milliband has been in the area, and we may yet send British troops. As our infantry and armoured units are already stretched, I think we probably will not send combat troops. But we may commit, en-



gineers, medical units, RAF transport aircraft and the like as part of a European force.

Whatever we do, I hope we do it soon. We ignored the slaughter in Rwanda and continue to do so in Darfur. Decades of guilt say that we should not look away again.

Oldies and boldies

I recently told the story of my encounter with crime in genteel Notting Hill. I witnessed a robbery, and failed to do much about it. Maybe - just maybe - the application of the curly end of my walking stick to the ankles of the escaping criminal, might have stopped him. But even if I had had the time to apply my crook to the crook, I might have lacked the guts. I don't know.

One who did not lack guts was the gent, well into his 80s, who witnessed two young men attacking the Rolex bedecked window displays of a jeweller in London. A crowd looked on as the oldie walked up and grabbed one of the sledge hammer wielding crooks. In the struggle, the robber lost his balaclava, and legged it. His mate was close behind.

Did the old timer have less to lose at the hands of a violent crook than the rest of us? Was he braver? Or was he raised in a time when people did not stand by and watch? Whatever; he is our hero of the week.

More on the Doctor Strangelove tests

Ted Clapp, who worked for BAS and lived in the Falklands for many years, read my story about Operaton Argus. This was the top secret American project to explode nuclear weapons high over the South Atlantic in an attempt to disrupt global communications.

In 1958. Ted was a young telecommunications engineer on one of the Antarctic bases, and he knew nothing of the atomic tests. But he did have a radio operator's view of other similar experiments.

"During the 60s and by then in Stanley," he writes, "I was asked to cooperate with an American listening programme. I was to monitor frequency failures during a high altitude hydrogen explosion. Six months later, I monitored a test in which a missile exploded a belt of copper needles. During the first experiment, there was a complete blackout for about half an hour. In the second experiment, frequencies failed completely for only about ten minutes, but were affected for about three days afterwards.

This was a worldwide listening programme involving a lot of nations so I'm not giving away any secrets. Hopefully.

Hopefully indeed, Ted. I understand that conditions at Guantanamo are still rather uncom-

Shameful end to Jhelum

Photos of the remains of the Jhelum brought tears to my eyes.

A friend in Stanley sent me snaps showing terrible storm damage to the once bluff-bowed East Indiaman. Jhelum's hulk had graced Stanley Harbour for a hundred years or more. But the winds, which were once her friend, finally destroyed her.

It should not have been allowed to happen. This was a ship of huge historical value, and she was an icon of Stanley. I fervently hope that moves are now afoot to protect the surviving stern section. The Falklands are not poor, and money should have been available for Jhelum's protection.

Historians and museums overseas are not innocent either. If they cared, as they say they do about what is often called the greatest graveyard of 19th Century shipping in the world, they could be helping to fund the conservation of Falklands hulks. There is, I am afraid, shame all around at the loss of a great landmark graham.bound@btinternet.co

Myra 'Birdie' Pitt: retired, not gone and certainly not forgotten

FROM the days when the basic training for the job consisted largely of being shown how to gear up a horse by Steve McKay or Bikey Anderson and then being taken for a ride round the Common. Camp teaching has been a testing occupation, requiring not only exceptional teachers, but also exceptional people.

In the very early days and for lack of the money to do otherwise, the government employed young men, usually in their gap year between school and university and recruited by the Voluntary Service Overseas Organisation.



Looking back over the years

Despite their lack of experience or qualification, some of these travelling teachers rose to the challenge and thrived, enriching in the process the lives of their pupils and the families with whom they were lodged, but others, faced with the isolation. the rigours of Camp life or the temptations of the bunkhouse, succumbed to homesickness, drink or depression.

What those early Camp teachers nearly all had in common, with one or two very honorable exceptions, including Richard Foggerty and Richard Stevens, is that after their one year of service, they left the Falklands never to return.

The sudden availability of money to pay qualified teachers, following on from the introduction of the Fisheries Conservation Zone, changed all that, as did one advertising campaign, which brought a small invasion of teachers from New Zealand over a period of about five years.

Not the first to arrive with that invasion and not the last to leave, because eighteen years later, she hasn't left yet and has no intention of doing so, was Myra Pitt. Myra, known far and wide in the Falklands as "Birdie," due to her habitual form of address, finally retired from Camp Education last year and has elected to stay in the Falklands.

After ten years of teaching in her native New Zealand and in Australia, Myra arrived in the Falklands in 1990, getting to Stanley just in time for Farmers' Week.

The Fox Bay East settlement school teacher was on leave, so Myra was sent there for six weeks. Anika

and Angie Clarke were among her

After this brief introduction to settlement living and the delights of West Falklands, began two years of travelling for Myra. Understandably, she is a little vague about quite all the places she went to and all the children she taught, but she seems to have criss-crossed the islands from East to West and North to South, including Roy Cove, Greenfield, Bombilla, Pebble Island, Salvador, Johnson's Harbour and Port San Carlos.

At some stage, also, Myra went, sometimes by boat (see picture) to the Murrel to teach Geoff Miller, who was later to write of her,

"I can still remember my lessons with you like it was yesterday. You made learning fun and interesting and I could certainly do with those excercises even today." (This is probably a reference to Myra's famous "mousercice" exercise video, also remembered with fondness by Sammy Marsh as the way each day began at Fox Bay School.)

Geoff continued, "A few of my teachers said that I would never do anything with my life, but I knew that with a bit of help from people like yourself, I would. Your time educating me must have been hard work at times and I will miss you dearly."

After two years of nomadic existence it was time for Myra to enjoy the luxury of her own house and school at Fox Bay East, where pupils included James and Karen Marsh, Sammy Marsh and Sam Cockwell. It was here that began for Myra the problems with recalcitrant stoves that seem to have marked her Falklands career. As she puts it, "during my

two years at Fox Bay, Bill Porter spent most of his time with his head in my fire." (The writer once visited Myra at Goose Green where she was moved in May 1994, this time to discover John Lee on his knees, dismantling Myra's central heating boiler).

While sad to leave Fox Bay at first, Myra soon settled into the Lafonia scene with her usual spirit and verve. By now there were roads and she had acquired, "Gertie" her first Land Rover.

As well as teaching the Goose Green pupils, Myra was also a radio teacher, as she had been for other pupils from her base at Fox Bay. A recommendation for Myra in this role came from Rhian Alazia of Port Edgar,

"I think you are a good telephone teacher because you are: kind, don't get angry, read stories that I enjoy, t me have my own responsibilities. We have fun with you at Farmers' Week and Summer School. I think you are one of the best swimming teachers in the world."

This testimonial and many others like it from both the Falklands and New Zealand were gathered together into a big blue book, beautifully bound by Camp teacher, Wendy Reynolds, when Myra retired in August last year. The perpetrators were colleagues Heather Norman and Sue Evans, who felt that although Myra, typically, did not want any fuss, her retirement should be marked. They wrote to former pupils and former colleagues and the result is an insightful collection of photographs, tales and testimonials.

Heather who came to the Falklands in 1997, and has herself opted to retire in Stanley, writes of Myra, "In all my time in the Falklands campers always ask with great affection, "How's old Birdie" I have never heard a word against you, Myra, from the late night in 1997 when you welcomed me with a Fosters and a jar of Vegemite, to the present day."

This little tribute neatly sums up several aspects of Myra's personality. First, she is universally liked. Born into a farming background in New Zealand, she makes no bones about her love of the Camp. Her willingness to join in with every aspect of Camp life has earned her many friends. The offer of vegemite, even at a late hour, demonstrates Myra's ready concern and warmth to others, even Australians and the mention of Fosters, coupled with other alcoholic references in her retirement book, speak for themselves about her willingness to join in the odd ceilidh.

Anna Stenning recalls Myra. "Meeting new travellers in Squid Row with the obligatory bottle of

Of all the quotes in her retirement book and there are many, attesting to Myra's capacity for successfully engaging sometimes difficult pupils in the business of learning and also supporting colleagues in difficulties, possibly this writer's favourite comes from Logan Dickson, who wrote, "Myra is my techer at farms week She macx me larff becuss she torcs


to be the Falkland Islands Government's conspicuous failure to recruit people from overseas, who 'fit in' and are neither moaners nor mediocrities, one might be tempted to think that Myra's arrival in the Falklands demonstrates that there used to be a better system.

Richard Foggerty, who as Director of Camp Education, was Myra's immediate boss throughout her Falklands career, indicates that this was not necessarily the case:

"Myra's application form, almost 20 years ago, sported one of those photocopied photographs that gave no indication of features, just the blackest of silhouettes, but fortunately her humour, commonsense and a genuine feel for people shone through her writing. The reality far exceeded the photocopy and I was privileged and often grateful for Myra's support and friendship over the years. We have been so lucky to have Myra with us in her capacity as a teacher and also as a member of



Why poppies for remembrance?

WHILE many who every year buy the Royal British Legion's poppies, may know that the origins of this symbol of remembrance have something to do with the First World War battles in Northern France and Belgium, probably few of us were aware that it was a poem, written by a Canadian, which inspired an American War Secretary, Moina Michael, to start selling poppies to raise money to help ex-service people and their families.

Colonel John Macrae, a doctor with the Canadian Armed Forces, wrote the poem after observing how the poppy flowered every year, bringing colour and hope even to the most wardevasted parts of Flanders.

Shortly after writing the poem, Colonel MaCrae died in a military hospital on the French coast. In Flanders' Fields John McCrae 1915

In Flanders' Fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place: and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders' Fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high, If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders' fields.

- 2. Roll out half the dough on a lightly floured surface and stamp out 12 x 7.5cm (3in) rounds and use to line a bun tray. Fill each pastry case with 1 tbsp mincemeat.
- 3. Roll out the remaining pastry and stamp out 12 x 6cm (2in) rounds. Brush lightly with water and cover the mincemeat, sealing the edges well. Use a fork to prick the surface of each pie (make a cook's taster with the trimmings and last of the mincemeat!) and cook towards the top of the oven for 20-25 minutes, until golden.





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Some difficult choices before the next budget

A PRESENTATION by Chief ExecutiveTim Thorogood, opened Tuesday's Public Meeting on the Green Paper on the Budget, which sets out the Government's views on its finances over the next five years and is designed to raise the level of understanding of financial issues and to stimulate debate about the choices that face the Islands

Mr Thorogood said that Government cut-backs over several years meant that the limits had been reached on what could be achieved through "good housekeeping.

The strain on public finances is greater now than ever before, with high expectations of public services.

The small population and remoteness of the Islands made everything particularly expensive, while there was a continual need to invest in economic growth and infrastructure, he said, adding that while strong fisheries revenues had allowed the development and delivery, at little charge, of services, which elsewhere would not be provided, or would be charged at full cost, a drop in Hex revenue over recent years meant that other means of financing had to be found.

Financial Secretary Keith Padgett, then presented an overview of the Government's present financial situation and projections, which demonstrated that in real terms Government raises less revenue and also spends less than it

did 10 years ago.

He explained that the main aim of the Government's 2007 Medium Term Financial Plan, which set targets for reducing spending by £0.5 million each year, was to reduce dependency on reducing Ilex revenues, to ensure sufficient budget surpluses to meet future cost pressures in periods of generally static Government revenues. It was hoped also to free up resources for redirection to new priorities in the Islands Plan.

However, the Chief Executive predicted that, based on the 2008/ 9 budget, targets in the MTFP would not be met for lack of sufficient revenue growth and expenditure reductions.

Government was likely to face

inflationary pressures on goods and services while on the revenue side *llex* income could be expected to continue to fall. Interest on investments was also likely to be limited in the global financial climate and government needed to further reduce spending or to increase its revenue through taxation or other means, Mr Thorogood

Government department heads had been asked to reduce expenditure by 3% this year, however following many years of pruning budgets the easy or obvious economies had already been made and some "difficult choices" would have to be made, he added.

Set out in the Green Paper were possible options on how to bridge the predicted £3 million gap in the MTFP by 2012/13:

* Raise £3m from personal tax - an average of £2,304 per year per person. This would hit the lower paid particularly hard.

* Raise £3m from company tax - an average of £55,555 per company (for a typical company currently paying £86,295 on a pre tax income of £357,159 in 2006). This would discourage investment and reduce economic growth.

* Reduce Health and Education spending by £1.5M each. This would mean ending medical treatments overseas for all but desperately urgent cases and all support for students overseas in further and higher education.

* Close the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCO) and/or cease the East to West ferry. This would mean large parts of the Government's strategy for providing a sustainable Camp would be negated and the waste of money already spent.

Dipping into Government's £87million Consolidated Fund would be irresponsible, said Mr Thorogood, adding that reducing Government expenditure was not automatically a good thing. Individuals, particularly the vulnerable and those on low incomes, would be affected. Less money in the economy would have a negative effect on business sales and economic growth.

Former governor fined

RICHARD Ralph, Governor of the Falklands from 1996 to 1999, has been fined £117,691.41 by the British Financial Services Authority (FSA) for insider trading.

According to FSA, when he was chairman of mining company, Monterrico Metals, Mr Ralph asked a friend to buy him shares in the company worth about £30,000, although at that time Monterrico Metals was in takeover talks with giant Chinese mining consortium, Zijin.

Mr Ralph was closely involved in the takeover talks and should have publicly disclosed any dealing in company shares.

Filip Boyen, who bought the shares for Mr Ralph, has also been fined by the FSA to the tune of £81,982.95.

WITH just one more week to go before the closing date of our survey of readers' opinions, I have been staggered by the scale of the response so far. Mind you, I write as one who typically fills surveys in, then forgets to post them.

Although my direct involvement with the paper has been only intermittent since 1996, when I resigned as Editor, *Penguin News* remains dear to my heart and so I have been unable to resist the temptation now and then to read the returns to get a sneak preview of what you, the

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Governor's role set to change

WITH the new Constitution Order approved by Her Majesty the Queen in the Privy Council last week and due to come into effect on January 1, 2009 the role of the Falkland Islands Governor is set to change.

He will now have to accept the advice of Executive Council on all matters, except those pertaining to external affairs, defence, internal security including the police, the administration of justice, audit and appointments to the public service, discipline and management of the public service in terms of good govemance.

The Governor, however must report to the Secretary of State and convey the views of ExCo on matters. Previously he could ignore the advice of Executive Council if he saw fit.

"The whole thrust of the 1997 White Paper was that elected members in the Government should be responsible for the territory concemed," said Governor Huckle.

He added that ever since he had been in the Islands he had seen it as part of his role to encourage that process and had passed on the task of reporting out of ExCo to an elected member soon after his arrival.

"It works well, it is for Councillors to justify their decisions," he said, adding that he had played a role in ensuring that it was also the thrust of the New Constitution.

He said London sees the role of the Governor differently now: the days when people could go up and ask about housing applications are long past. The Governor is now viewed as a fail safe device, there to protect the independence of the judiciary and the administration of jus-

Governor Huckle said the same goes for the public service of which

the Chief Executive is the head, but under the direction of the Governor. The reason the Governor gets involved in appointments and discipline is to protect the impartiality of the civil service. "That's the long established British system," he

Within the new Constitution are the appointments of the Public Accounts Committee and the Complaints Commissioner which the Governor said are important steps forward. Legislation will have to be brought in for both, and active dis-cussions are under way as to how they should be set up

The new Constitution is a significant step towards greater self governance of the territory by elected representatives and the Falklands cannot now be portrayed as a colonial situation; the colonial Governor is long gone, said Governor

Last week the Argentine Government lodged a protest note about the new Falklands Constitution.

"It can't have taken the Argentine Government by surprise," said Mr Huckle.

"The Argentine Government likes to portray this as a bilateral issue between the Argentine and British Governments, whereas the UK Government clearly has another partner in this which is the Falkland Islands Government and the Constitution recognises this. We do not rule the Falkland Islands in an arbitrary or colonial way, nor do I think we did in the height of the colonial system.

That they have protested is part of their current system of seeking to protest about the sovereignty issue that the UK Government is perfeetly clear on, said Governor Huckle, adding that a response will be made to the protest.

Difficult choices before next budget

Continued from the front In line with the purpose of the Green Paper, which seeks as many views as possible, the meeting was opened up for discussion.

Means testing for medical and education services was suggested, but did not meet with a lot of sup-

port from the floor.

Leading this discussion, Karen Lee said that in her experience means testing was never fair, as there were always families who were border line and could possibly suffer, as could students, if their parents chose to spend their money on things other than their education.

Mrs Lee suggested other options such as a tax break for those fund-ing their childrens' education or student loans.

Other members of the public agreed that it would be unsavoury to return to the former regime which gave only the gifted or the children of the wealthy the opportunity of further education.

Asked for an assurance that a balanced or surplus budget would be produced next June, Cllr Summers said it had been the intention of every council he had been on. "It's not just about the will of the council, the real will has to come from the public to reduce expenditure,' he added.

"That's what this discussion is all about - is there a will among the public to allow us to cut services to be able to produce a surplus budget?

While accepting that cuts in services would affect a number of people, Cllr Summers said that all these things were discretionary and should be viewed in the light of the broad national interest. He added that he would never be persuaded by the view that certain parts of the Falkands did not matter and that the population should all move into Stanley. This was, he said, a national issue and a balance in our expenditure had to be found that would support and give hope to the whole country

New Haven Ferry Terminal opening: celebrating the realisation of a dream

"THIS ceremony is a tribute to those who had the political courage, belief and perseverance to keep to the vision and ensure that the project was successfully completed."

With these words, His Excellency the Governor, Mr Alan Huckle, formally opened the New Haven Ferry Terminal on Satur-

On what was a bright, dry, if somewhat chilly day, at New Haven, a crowd of more than a hundred people from Stanley and the Camp gathered to enjoy the occasion.

Describing himself as "the Governor's warm-up act" Councillor John Birmingham, who holds the Legislative Council's Transport Portfolio, opened the formal proceedings with a speech in which he paid tribute to the late Robin Lee, who as a Legislative Councillor, was one of the early campaigners for an East-West, ferry.

Cllr Birmingham said that the ferry terminal was the biggest project ever undertaken by the Public Works Department, involving the excavation and haulage of over one quarter of a million tons of material. 5,190 metres of drilling had been carried out by Henry McLeod and 16,800 kgs of high explosive had been used.

In his turn, Governor Huckle also referred to the long history of the cross-sound ferry project, commenting that the concept of the ferry had been around since the earliest economic studies, including Shackleton's in 1976, and supported by every transport infrastructure study since.

Mr Huckle said that once authority to proceed with the construction of the terminal at New Haven and a facility in Port Howard was granted by Executive Council in September 2007, the project was completed in a remarkably short time for such a major construction effort.

The Governor said that the task had been tough for PWD and their contractors, who had worked

through the winter, often in cold and wet conditions, not helped by the remoteness of the site and weight restrictions on the road.

That the project now stood completed was, said Mr Huckle, a real tribute to all involved, including PWD's construction partner, Morrison (Falklands) Ltd, who did all the piling and concrete work, Martech and Work Boat Services, who helped with the design and Neil and Mike McKay who provided heavy machinery.

For the occasion the terminal was made festive by the presence of a marquee and a brightly coloured 'bouncy castle.' An excellent picnic lunch was provided by Shorty's Diner and further convenience for all came in the form of the mobile toilet block, normally deployed at the Gypsy Cove car park.

The event, which was funded by FIDC and organised by Charlene Rowland, cost, she informed *Penguin News*, less than its £5,000 budget and certainly seemed to be much enjoyed by all present

Like many strategic initiatives, the ferry project had had its detractors with legitimate questions about its affordability. The expectation was, however that a reliable ferry service linking the two main islands of the Falklands would encourage easier economic and social links between East and West Falklands, help to generate new business and make land-based tourism more attractive, said Governor Huckle.

Fuel price concerns

INIATED by former West Falkland councillor, Bill Luxton of Chartres, a meeting was held at Fox Bay this week to discuss the implication of fuel prices.

Last week *Penguin News* reported that fuel prices were not set to fall in line with global prices due to a debt incurred by Stanley Services Ltd (SSL) when advised by the government not to pass the full increase on the the customer earlier this year.

Mr Luxton said that Camp residents expressed "anger and serious concern" for the effect on their businesses, following the news that local fuel prices would not be reduced in the near future.

Fuel consumption is rising rapidly on farms as the season gets under way and the opinion was that there could be no valid reason for local prices not to follow world prices down in the same way that they have risen, Mr Luxton reported.

There was a strong feeling that the fuel pricing formula and policy should be far more transparent and it was also felt that the public should be told exactly what influences the government had on price changes in the recent past.

It was considered "ludicrous"

It was considered "ludicrous" that the petrol price here is not far off that in the UK - but the latter price is approximately 70% tax, concluded Mr Luxton.

Councillor Mike Summers said that in June, SSL asked shareholders (which included the government) for permission to increase the price of both diesel and kerosene by three pence per litre.

"On top of the several previous monthly increases, FIG in Executive Council took the view that, whilst the Domestic Fuel Formula (DFF) calculation clearly supported such an increase, this was becoming too much for customers to bear and requested the FIG directors to ask the company to restrict the increases to two pence and one pence respectively.

"FIG clearly understood that this would increase the notional debtor figure between the DFF and SSL, but considered that since it appeared that fuel was near the top of its price range, this was a reasonable course of action. In the event, the company increased both prices by two pence, which the management has discretion to do."

Clir Summers said that while clearly recognising that in taking this action, and increasing the debt, it would take slightly longer for the price to fall back when base prices fell (because the debtor figure has to be reduced eventually), FIG took the view that smoothing the prices would be more in the interest of customers, particularly in respect of heating fuel.

At no time did FIG give SSL

At no time did FIG give SSL any instructions on how prices should be reduced, and this seems to have been a misunderstanding from the article published in last week's *Penguin News*, said Mr Summers.

Plaque blooper the last laugh?

CONSTRUCTOR OF THE STATE OF THE

DURING the ceremonial opening of the Newhaven Ferry Terminal, much mention was made of cooperation, for example between the Public Works Department and its contractors.

So important a feature of this difficult project was cooperation, that it was given a mention on the commemorative plaque, which, atop a neat cairn, marks the occasion of the opening.

Sadly however, and apparently largely unnoticed by the many people who looked at the plaque on Saturday, the word cooperation is spelled incorrectly (see above).

Fortunately at *Penguin News*, where we are continually haunted by the fear of our own spelling mistakes or typos, we have developed a sympathetic attitude, mixed with a little gleeful gloating, when we come across other peoples' mistakes.

In the end, despite whatever rigorous system of scrutiny may be employed, mistakes like this can happen to anybody.

The text for the New Haven plaque was organised by Robert McLeod of the Public Works Department, approved by Roads Engineer Bob Hancox, who must surely have thought there could be no more technical problems to deal with on the project and duly delivered to The Pod Gift Shop, where the wording was etched.

Closer scrutiny of the plaque revealed that the construction company responsible for the building of the actual dock, Morrison (Falklands) Ltd, had been referred to as 'Morrisons' and as merely 'assisting' when it is well known they have a partnership agreement with the government and the terminal project was a joint venture.

While the friendly rivalry and practical jokes between the Public Works and Morrison gangs during their residence at Goose Green are legendary, one can't help but wonder if the Government boys got the last laugh - or did they?

Court news

Suspended sentence for common assault

IN THE Senior Magistrate's Court on Wednesday, Adrian Minnell of Stanley was given a sentence of one month's imprisonment, suspended for one year.

Mr Minnell had earlier pleaded guilty to a charge of common assault on Carole Lynda Buckland. A charge of causing actual bodily harm was dismissed by the court for lack of evidence.

Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds, said in sentencing that the court took domestic violence very seriously.

The court had to consider a custodial sentence, in view of the fact that Mr Minnell had not pleaded self-defence, had a previous history of violence related to alcohol consumption and the fact that financial penalties and probation orders in the past did not seem to have had the desired effect.

Pre-sentence report for assault and harassment

A pre-sentence report was ordered on Stanley man Jason Morris, who had previously pleaded guilty to two charges of assault and one of harassment against his former partner.

Considering it not to be in the public interest or in the interest of Ms Paredes to further prolong a case, which had first come to court in August, Crown Counsel, Elliott Taylforth offered no evidence against Mr Morris on the original charge of assault. The charge was reduced to common assault to which Mr Morris again pleaded not guilty. The charge was considered not to be in the public interest to pursue and was dismissed by the court.

In respect of the offences to which Mr Morris had pleaded guilty, which covered a period of several months, Mrs Faulds said that she was concerned both by the length of time involved and their seriousness.

The case was adjourned till January 2009. Mr Morris was released on bail with the condition that he cooperate fully with the Social Work Department.

Speeding fine

Mario Anthony Green who pleaded guilty by post to driving at 35mph on Ross Road East on August 15, was fined £120 pounds and made to pay £70 prosecution costs in the Magistrate's Court this week

Trial date for theft case

Tuesday, December 9 was set as the day when the case against Charlotte McRae will be tried. Ms McRae, who appeared in the Magistrate's Court on November 12, for a pre-trial review, had pleaded not guilty to two charges of theft and one of attempted theft.

Museum presentation revives memories of a grand old lady

MEMORIES of the *Uganda*, one of the Falkland Islands favourite ships, were stirred up in Stanley last week, by frequent visitor to the Islands, Nicci Pugh.

A nurse in 1982. Nicci presented to the museum a large photograph of the ship, which had previously formed the centre piece of one of the displays in the Imperial

one of the displays in the Imperial War Museum's Falklands War, 25th Anniversary Exhibition.

During the war with Argentina, Nicci served aboard the *Uganda*. She was a member of the Queen Alexandra's Royal Naval Nursing Service (QARNNS), the only female military unit to have worked in a combat zone up to that time.

As a specialist in the nursing of trauma patients, many of the now well-known casualties of the Falk-lands war, such as Denzil Connick and Simon Weston passed through Nicci's hands, part of the hundreds of wounded, mainly British, but also Argentinean, who were treated for burns and other often horrific injuries in the former public rooms of what had once been an elegant

ocean liner

Completed in 1952, as a passenger-cargo ship for the British India Steam Navigation Company (BI) the *Uganda* spent fifteen years running between Britain and East Africa, before being converted for a new life as an educational cruise ship in 1968.

SS Uganda was on a cruise of the Mediterranean in 1982, still in the role of a floating school, when she became one of the many civilian "ships taken up from trade," or 'stuft' to use the Ministry of Defence's quaint phrase, to serve support the Falklands Task Force.

The *Uganda*'s young passengers found that their educational cruise ended unexpectedly in Naples and the ship then sailed to Gibraltar for a three day conversion into its hospital ship role.

What happened next for what was now. "Her Majesty's Hospital Ship. *Uganda*" will be chronicled by Nicci Pugh in a book she has written, which is currently in the editing stages and tentatively entitled "White Ship. Red Crosses.

Your questions answered

Q IS it common practice that a doctor does not go out to a road traffic accident casualty?

A Dr Roger Diggle responded to this series of questions.

Each situation is assessed by the hospital staff on the basis of the information available.

The normal ambulance response is for the on call Casualty Staff Nurse to attend the scene of any incident. A doctor will attend either if the initial information suggests that a doctor is needed or if the Casualty Staff Nurse requests their attendance.

WHY does it take so long to get an ambulance to the scene if they do not have to wait for anyone?

It is not cost effective to have an ambulance crew on permanent instant standby.

The accepted maximum response time within Stanley is 15 minutes. This is because:

1. The emergency call is received by the police who then call the hospital ward, who then contact the duty driver and on call casualty staff nurse

2. The duty driver may be out of the hospital on other duties

3. The emergency equipment that needs to be on charge needs to be put into the ambulance

4.The on call casualty staff nurse has to be collected en route to the incident

5.The response time to an incident outside of Stanley then needs to take account of the driving time from Stanley to the incident – depending upon the location a decision will be made whether to ask the MPA medical centre ambulance to respond or to ask for a helicopter to attend the scene.

ARE those who attend accidents without an accompanying doctor fully qualified to deal with emergency situations?

Q DURING the recent world-wide banking crisis the British Government offered a guarantee that savers deposits up to the sum of €50,000 would be safe. As we are limited in our banking options here in the Falklands, do the Falkland Islands Government offer a similar guarantee and if not, why not?

A Financial Secretary, Keith Padgett and the Standard Chartered Bank Manager, Rino Donosepoetro have compiled this response

The Falkland Islands Government has not considered the question of guarantees for savers. It should be borne in mind that the guarantee offered by the British Government relates to personal savings not those associated with businesses.

There is naturally a risk associated with any investment, not just investments made in stocks and shares and it is the view of the Treasury that it would be inappropriate to risk public funds in order to mitigate the risk of investments made by individuals.

The Manager of Standard Chartered Bank issued a statement on the strength of the bank and its asset base in the early stages of the current banking crisis, and the bank has again confirmed that:

"Standard Chartered is in great shape, strongly capitalised and highly liquid. Our policy is to maintain adequate liquidity at all times in all geographical regions and countries so that the Bank can meet its obligations."

I WAS saddened and shocked to read that the Development Corporation and government no longer consider the dairy to be a business worth investing in and that everyone is happy with UHT imported

In this global climate of food shortages, when the rest of the world are feeling the need to tighten their belts and produce. rather than import, the Falklands feel this is the time to rely more than ever on the rest of the world. The cost of milk and other food stuffs are going to go up a lot more and we should be staying as self sufficient as we can.

Tonight on the Midland News it was highlighted that due to the number of farmers abandoning their farms, as they can no longer afford them, there is for the first time in memorable history of the industry a need to import milk! Farmers and business advisors expressed their concern at this trend as dairy herds take generations to develop and replacing the loss will

have an ongoing long term impact on the country.

The Falklands had no dairy herd to speak of (not discounting those Campers who kept small herds of their own) until Malcolm Ashworth combined his knowledge of the industry with imported stock and local bred, hardy cattle to produce his unique herd. His land improvments and ability to grow feed was incredible when you look at the struggles that still face agriculture in the Falklands. Why and how can all this be allowed to be lost? Are we going backwards? Do we want to be reliant on the outside world for even those things we are capable of producing ourselves... shame on you!

Besides all that, that stuff they call milk.. in packets with UHT stuck on the side.. yeuk! It tastes worse than the separated milk that when I was a child in Darwin we fed to the hens and the dogs!

I AGREE wholeheartedly with the Deputy Editor and Stan Smith when they say it seems ridiculous that a community with an agricultural background cannot produce a supply of fresh milk and other food products. However, there are a few points which need clarifying

When Stanley supported three dairies the UHT treatment for milk had not been thought of and pasteurisation was not universally accepted so it was fresh or powdered milk only.

After the 1982 conflict when it was decided to relocate and continue milk production for the town, the number of sites available was quite limited. Those were the days when we didn't have a road network or cross-sound ferry so production had to be relatively close to the market.

The site at Beckside/ Mullet Creek turned out to be the only suitable option at the time and once the initial development had been carried out it proved quite adequate and successful for almost 20 years. Not only did we supply all Stanley's needs for fresh milk, cream and eggs, we regularly supplied these commodities to Camp and to visit-

ing vessels. Stanley Dairy milk was also sent to BAS bases on occasions. A little bit of upgrading (costing much less than £65,0000!) could have ensured the continuation of this service for many years

Stan's suggestion of a move to Burnside/Goose Green is interesting but a non-starter for me. I wouldn't fancy a 60 mile trip on that road with a van load of milk before doing a milk round, and with current fuel prices it would probably be cheaper to pour petrol over your cereal! When we came to the Falklands to start the Goose Green Dairy it was the then FIC Camp Manager, Brook Hardcastle's hope that we would be able to produce cream and butter there which could be sold to Stanley. Thirty years on and the wheel's gone full circle!

Finally to all those people who keep asking if/when are we going to return to the dairy - we're probably a bit old for full-time dairying and I have a house to finish first(!), but I have offered to give advice, suggestions and practical help to try and sort out the current problems, but as yet this has not been taken up.

Reduced sheep numbers a concern for the wool and meat industries

GROWING concerns about reduced sheep numbers in the Falklands in recent years lead to a constructive discussion at Monday's meeting of the Agricultural Advisory Committee meeting.

Councillor John Birmingham raised the subject and asked if members saw the future in reduced numbers and more productive animals and if the Sand Bay Abattoir could be sustained with the present drop in numbers.

Senior Agricultural Advisor Mac MacArthur said there were various reasons why numbers were reduced, not all related to the poor lambing of recent years or supply to the abattoir.

Farmers are working off their farms more in other businesses such as tourism, while others are making the decision that lambs are more valuable going to slaughter than to cover shearing costs and other variable overheads. Mr Birmingham was told. "There is strength in that the ewe numbers are still there," added Ian Campbell.

Councillor Ian Hansen, chairing the meeting, said there was a danger that people got, "too hung up about numbers," and used his own experience as an example. In 1990 at his West Falkland farm almost 6,000 sheep were shorn, however in recent years, with a reduction in both numbers and fibre diameter,

less than 4,000 sheep had been shorn, with an almost equivalent

Meat Company representative John Ferguson said that a plateau had now been reached in regard to numbers at the abattoir. A number of farms had moved to ewe flocks and with a lambing percentage anywhere below 70% they would find it hard to keep their heads above water. 15-20 years ago farmers needed 60-65% lambing just to maintain their flock, he added.

The committee acknowledged that wool prices are "grim". They could remain so for several years, said Mrs Rendell,

As a result of this it was expected, said Mr Ferguson, that there would be added pressure for ewes to be processed this season. While there was nothing to stop this, it was concerning that ewes in good condition and meeting the right criteria would achieve a better price at the abattoir than other farmers could afford to pay for them to boost their stock.

It was suggested that an, 'alarm system' was needed between the abattoir and the Department of Agriculture so that the situation can be monitored.

The problem has been identified and for the greater good some serious discussion needs to take place, said Cllr Birmingham.

New Chater book with a difference

WHAT do you do if you have already written what many consider to be the best ever coffee table book about the Falklands?

One answer would be to wait a few years and then bring out a second, up-to-date edition of the original, or you could decide to do something completely different. The latter option is the one taken by Tony Chater, author of the very popular *The Falklands*, which came out in 1984 and has been a preferred gift for beloved relatives and visiting dignitaries ever since.

The new book, which will hopefully will be in the Stanley shops before Christmas, is very different from his first in some ways, but still a delight to both the eye and the mind

If The Falklands was largely concerned with the human history of the Falklands, the first part of falklandscapes is, as implied by the name, largely concerned with the geological history, or how the landscape came to be as it is.

If this sounds dull, it's not. The illustrations are so good and the information which accompanies them presented in such a low key, unobtrusive way, that the book would still be a pleasure even to a complete non-reader.

The Falklands landscape is viewed through all of our seasons and there are sections in the book which deal with wildlife and with the remnants of our maritime heritage.

If human kind is largely absent from its pages, falklandscapes does contain a number of flashes of the particular humour of its author, who is described in the flyleaf as, "living mainly in private parts of the Falklands"

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Out of my window

I HAVE learned a great deal whilst being involved in the project to design the new prison which I am now watching grow. One of the first real surprises was that when designing and building a prison it is as much about keeping people out as keeping them in!

It seems that all the powers that have anything to do with ensuring that something goes well and is not affected by weather or calamity, an 'Anti Murphy's Law' if you like, conspired a second time on this build. So it was that the second and final concrete ceiling/floor panel was cast. Ready mix concrete arrived in an uninterrupted flow and competent hands worked the heavy mass. With all round access to this slab, there was no need to resort to suspended workmen to float off the vast expanse. In no time at all and certainly by 'smoko' time, the slab was under the control of the workmen who tended it. As it cured, they again achieved an excellent finish to the surface.

The work of the block layer continued during the period. He set about completing the outer perimeter wall. This will provide secure access to the south end of the prison into the old exercise yard, through the reopened east door I wrote about many weeks ago. It was at this point that I was called to visit.

The site slopes considerably from south to north. The building nestles into the cut excavated at the start of the project. The retaining wall stops any encroachment from the tall banks, but also provides the secure outer perimeter on the south

side of the build and in the south east corner. This provided a dilemma; the wall from within the secure area, or from a prisoner's point of view, is several metres high, presenting a formidable scaling challenge. However, from the outside it is not so tall, due to the raised earth and natural slope of the site. We were faced with the unusual problem of how to keep people out rather than keep them in. A solution was arrived at, I am glad to say, which will prove effective and inexpensive. Another local solution in a unique situation.

Despite the wishes of several people. I have not yet been walled up. Thankfully the doorway between the two buildings on the first floor ensures that, as the west wall grows, I can still see out of my window.

I have, however, been under heavy attack. Despite a determination not to be inconvenienced by the work, I have had to make several tactical withdrawals from my office to take telephone calls. Workmen set about cutting off the eastern overhanging edge of the old station's roof to allow the block work to rise without obstruction. The cacophony of noise created by power tools cutting metal and timber, only inches away from where I sat at my computer terminal, was accentuated by the thin ceiling boards which vibrated, if not in harmony, then certainly in sympathy with the protestations of their fellow building materials. The familiar smell, taste and sight of a hunFalkland Islands Police takes an occasional look outside as the new prison and station renovations take shape...

dred years of accumulated dust filled my office.

Opening my window to allow fresh air to circulate last Monday morning, I was able to discuss the forthcoming weeks work with the assembled workmen. They were making full use of the rising sun flooding the area with warmth and brightness, whilst the old building provided shelter from the prevailing westerly wind. Comments were banded about of cups of coffee being handed out, which lead inevitably, given the events of the latter part of last week, to suggestions that perhaps it would be 'coke'.

The arrival on site of a crane is normally the precursor to something momentous. I was not disappointed. Sling loads of wooden frame work appeared and were stacked on the first floor. As the week came to an end, these frames were placed around the outside of the ground floor walls. The frame work, built off site, fitted into position and now covers the entire outer walls of the prison. All the windows and doors appear to be in the right place, which is an advantage. This frame work will be filled with insulating material and clad in ship lap boarding to match the style of cladding on the original east end attachment, which was demolished to make way for the new build. It will provide balance, when viewed overall, with the cladding on the existing west end attachment.

The whole effect will be to soften and disguise the nature of the

building within and provide thermal efficiency.

Friday afternoon provided the perfect opportunity to visit the site again. I was able to step into the prison area, now complete with concrete ceiling. Most of the formwork and supporting structure used to achieve the ceiling/floor pour, had been removed and this allowed me to walk around the facility. I was pleased with the general feel of the area and could, without much difficulty, imagine the area functioning with a resident or two. I was able to see the old door that used to be the entrance to the CID department from the other side. It will, or at least when replaced with a secure door, provide the entrance to the prison from the police station. It felt good to see that the plans work in reality, vindication, if any were needed, of the local PWD design team and Morrison's work force. Keep up the good work. I will provide a crate on the final Friday of the project and I promise it will not be herbal tea!

It's Monday November 10. Whilst visiting the new prison cells on Friday I found myself pondering their occupancy. Much discussion has taken place, since the project started, as to who might be the first prisoner or prisoners to take up residence. As the Falkland Islands proclaims its zero tolerance of illicit drugs, perhaps it would be fitting if its first occupants were persons involved, however tenuously, in the hideous international trade in co-caine.

November planning and building update

By Graham France

THE ranks of the committee chaired by Councillor John Birmingham, were bolstered by two members of the Historic Buildings Committee (Dawn Hoy and Gerald Cheek) who attended for discussion on alterations to two listed buildings, fire precaution works and an office extension to Government House and the removal of a chimney and extension of the lean-to at 20 Drury Street for Juanita Brock. Both schemes were granted conditional planning permission.

Before the general list of planning applications was reviewed members considered a report by the Environmental Planning Officer (Antony Payne) on draft alterations to the Stanley Town Plan. A number of these amendments had been agreed in June this year and in September it was agreed a further set of recommendations relating to the release of green space in the town for residential development be included.

The committee, on considering the report, agreed to endorse its broad analysis and conclusions and to seek agreement from Executive Council on the proposed changes and authority to undertake public consultation on them. It is expected that such consultation will commence in January 2009 and last for a period of approximately two months.

Aside from the two earliermentioned applications, there were eleven other submissions seeking planning permission. Those seeking detailed consent were as follows, each receiving conditional approval: the erection of a small store with wash facilities and bed-sit at The Boathouse on Ross Road for SAMS Limited, erection of a conservatory and associated decking at 1 Biggs Road for Richard Morrison and Sally Owen, the erection of a single-storey dwelling at 4 Pitaluga Place for Simon Francis, at 3 Davis Street West the repositioning of a porch, replacement of a window with

patio doors, creation of a parking area and the erection of decking for Chedwin Knipe, the construction of a temporary ice-rink at the Jetty Centre Car Park for Steve Dent, the installation of a forty-metre antenna mast for digital TV and radio at the KTV Site on Sapper Hill for KTV Limited (here the committee noted that earlier objections from Cable and Wireless had been satisfactorily resolved); Stanley Golf Club's application to construct a cricket oval on their course in Stanley; alterations to the approved parking area in front of new houses built in Fitzroy Road for the Falkland Islands Company; and the proposed extension to his dwelling at 4 Brandon Road West for Justin McPhee.

The remaining two applications were for planning permission in principle. These were for a dwelling with off-street parking at 16 Fieldhouse Close for John and Maggie Battersby and for a dwelling to be built at the rear of 6 Pioneer Row for Agron Stewart, Both received conditional outline con-

Building Adviser, Nick Stephens, then introduced his list of applications for a building permit. Of the seventeen listed, he was able to report his satisfaction with two and had issued the necessary permits. In one other case he sought the views of members as from the information he had been able to obtain it did seem the proposed dwelling did not include the required standards of insulation, in particular to the external walls. Following discussion it was resolved to grant a building permit but subject to conditions which would ensure the requirements of the Building Regulations were to be met in construction. In each of the other fourteen applications, further information was awaited from the applicants.

The next meeting is scheduled to be held on the 4th December, starting at 8.30am in the Liberation Room at the Secretariat.

National Beef Herd looks set to return to original feeding ground

THE National Beef Herd is on the move again and looks set to return to Saladero from the West unless any farmer can put forward a plan to manage the cattle to the highest standard on their own land.

The herd has been managed by Rodney and Carole Lee at White Rock, a part of Port Howard, since July 2004.

It was agreed that the herd would be managed for 10 years with a review after five years, however the Department of Agriculture had received notification from the Lees advising that they are not able to spend as much time at White Rock as they would like to, Senior Agricultural Advisor Mac MacArthur told a meeting of the Advisory Committee on Monday.

Mr MacArthur said that with Brian Aldridge as the new manager at Saladero, proposed new management of the research/demonstration farm is being instigated to demonstrate managed intensive grazing.

"The development of improved pasture from white grass requires cattle as effective grazers and developers of camps," he added.

Having the National Beef Herd cows and bulls readily available to be observed at open days and when farmers are passing through provided an opportunity for people to check out the genetics of the herd and the husbandry and management methods being used to improve beef productivity and provide superior quality beef bulls. Mr MacArthur explained.

The shifting of the herd will not incur any costs to the Department

other than the transfer from West to East Falkland, said the Director of Agriculture, Phyl Rendell, as the agreement with White Rock had been that they would retain some of the excess stock for managing the herd.

It is anticipated that once the calves are weaned in May 2009 and the cows pregnancy tested they can be relocated to Saladero, unless a solid management plan or expression of interest is received in the interim.

STANLEY'S first team opened the season with an emphatic victory over the visiting Royal Naval frigate.

Stanley Services Ltd: Kerosene price explosion not imminent

STANLEY SERVICES Ltd, the sole licensed providers of petroleum products in the Falkland Islands, were quick to respond to a radio report on Wednesday that the price of kerosene could shortly be doubled.

On Wednesday, a company spokesperson said that it could reassure the public that there would be no increase to the price of kerosene on December 1.

The source of the report on the Falkland Islands Radio Service's News Midday programme was a media briefing on Tuesday, when Government spokesman, Councillor Mike Summers, explained the workings of the government im-

posed formula for the fixing of fuel prices.

Giving the assurance that the prices of petrol and diesel at the pumps could be expected ultimately to reflect the recent downward movement of crude oil prices, he said that no such assurance could be given at the moment in the case of kerosene, due to a recent rise in its price by the Ministry of Defence, from whom it had been purchased for the last twenty years.

Cllr Summers said: "For some reason entirely unknown to anybody, they have almost doubled the selling price of kerosene. We think it's probably an error, but

we can't get to the source of it just yet, so we are in a real conundrum about whether we will be able to continue to supply kerosene at a reasonable price."

While seeking further information from the Defence Fuels Establishment in the UK, Stanley Services was working hard to find alternative sources of kerosene, said Councillor Summers, including in South America, where although prices were relatively high, cost of delivery, would be less.

Stanley Services General Manager. Robert Rowlands said the public should be reassured that the company at present had considerable stocks of kerosene.

New leaders in renewable energy?

THE supply and installation of a third flywheel and additional control equipment to augment the Sand Bay Wind Farm project was approved by ExCo last week.

Members were advised that the most significant impact of this additional control equipment would be the reduction on the number of running hours of the larger diesel sets, which would increase their total life and reduce ongoing maintenance costs. The additional £140,000 cost is to be funded by virement.

Councillor Mike Rendell said that at a recent seminar for European Union, Overseas Territories and Countries (OTC), it was noted that the Falklands are in the leading group of those represented in respect of percentage of electricity produced from renewable resources.

He added that the projected 40% fuel displacement level, when Phase Two of the wind farm is completed, would potentially place the Falklands in the lead of all OTCs, despite the fact that the Falklands uses wind power alone, while some others are using hydro generating power.

Longer wait for would-be residents pending public consultation on immigrant points scheme

FURTHER delays are a prospect for anyone seeking to apply for Permanent Residence Permit (PRP) in the Falkland Islands.

At its meeting last week, Executive Council (ExCo) agreed that in order to ensure full public consultation on the proposed introduction of an Immigration Points System, the moratorium on applications for permanent residence applications, which was imposed in January 2007 and was supposed to end on January 25 2009, would now be extended until the end of March 2009.

Members were informed that a comprehensive paper shortly to be made public by the Government Secretary contained proposals for the introduction of a points system for general migrants, taking into account their skills, salary, duration of employment offer and work experience relevant to the offer. Age, length of time in the community and pension plan arrangements of the principal applicant, plus property and cash assets, jointly with spouse or partner would also be considered.

The three year qualifying period to make an application for a PRP would continue.

Policy issues included, good health and clean criminal records

for all applicants, a good standard of English and satisfactory accommodation arrangements. Younger skilled migrants would be preferred, but over 50's would be accepted, provided they had comprehensive medical insurance or could provide a bond and there would be different points thresholds for single and partnered applicants.

Prospective applicants could assess themselves against the points system and apply, if they considered they had met or exceeded the points threshold, said Councillor Mike Rendell.

LEGISLATIVE and Executive Council meetings and the decisions made at them have taken up a fair part of the paper this week, as this Council reached the grand old age of three and the very last Legislative Council meeting was held.

The Green Paper on the budget is still promoting lots of discussion around the Islands, as intended, although debate, as such, in Legislative Council, never really got off the ground. It is difficult to have a lively debate, when all those in attendance agree with each other.

Not that our Councillors are in anyway short of words. It is a source of some amusement, when listening to the live broadcast, that so many

bouts of speechifying begin with the words "I'll be brief..."

One of the things I have to mention, however, is that the art of public speaking does not seem to have been among the 'lessons learned' by most councillors over the last three years. Sentences that don't finish, topics that change and irrelevant references to others, leave anyone that is listening intently, or worse still transcribing the words, wondering if they have heard correctly or what exactly was meant. Or is that the art of 'politician speak' well and truly mastered?

An example that has drawn comment this week was when Councillor Janet Robertson spoke of the zero tolerance attitude to drugs in the Falklands and congratulated the authorities involved in the recent Class

A drugs seizure on a fishing vessel.

Having expressed faith that Falklands children are not consuming drugs of this type any where in the world, Councillor Robertson admitted that when out of the Islands young people might feel tempted or be persuaded to indulge and continued, "experimentation is really part of youth, but I urge you to remember that is as far as it should go and the attitude here is not the same as the UK. Don't get too tempted or carried away while there, it could go horribly wrong." Am I wrong in thinking that this left many listeners wondering if the message to youngsters was that it was OK to experiment with drugs, as long as you don't do it here.

With her own two young children no doubt destined for college overseas some day, I am sure that Councillor Robertson would never encourage the recreational use of drugs in any form, but this example shows that as we approach a new era in Falkland Islands Government history, it is even more important for our representatives, than for the rest of us, to check that what they say is exactly what they mean.

AN accolade this week goes to the Goose Green Café where Trudi, James and Bev Lee serve an all day-breakfast after which a shearer would never be able to bend over and best of all, sticking with Falklands tradition, it includes mutton chops. "We're in the Camp, so lets do it the Camp way," said Trudi. I couldn't agree more!



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Business arrangement aids road capping programme

GIVING an update on the road programme for the 2009/10 and 2010/11seasons at the Transport Advisory Committee this week, Roads Engineer Bob Hancox, said that savings had been made through an "alternative arrange-ment" to building a road to Doyle Farm (formerly known as East Bay) on West Falklands.

Doyle Farm owner Rikki Evans confirmed that he had negotiated a £200,000 mortgage agreement with the Development Corporation with a Government guarantee to buy Bold Cove Farm. It was part of the agreement that no road would be built to Doyle Farm under the present ownership, or in the future, should the farm change hands. "There are no plans to sell the farm and there were definitely no handouts involved," said Mr Evans.

The saving to FIG of £500,000 is be spread over two years, leaving £500,000 for the 2009/10 season and £70,000 for 2010/11. Prior to this arrangement the Capital programme had £850,000 allocated to cover both years.

In the first year, road capping on East Falkland would be carried out using £200,000 of the funding on the New Haven road, to allow year-round non winter weight limit restricted access to the ferry terminal, said Mr Hancox.

Capping on West Falkland was to be contracted out, originating from Port Howard settlement (£100,000) and a further £200,000 was budgeted for construction of a road to Westley and road upgrades, improved sight lines and a safety programme.

In 2010/11 capping is planned on both East and West Falklands, by both direct labour and contractors, with material all processed through a mobile crusher and distributed from strategic stockpiles (£500,000). "This major push on capping will need to be supported by the purchase of an additional drill rig and will also benefit from more lorries and personnel being available, due to no asphalting in this year. It is proposed that the plant be relocated to Pony's Pass to effect operational savings," said Mr Hancox.

A further £100,000 for road upgrades in selected areas was allocated and £100,000 towards the drill rig. "An alternative was still being considered," said Mr Hancox, adding that the current drill rig was not able to cope with the work needed for recapping. "If the old rig broke, all three projects (capping on East and West and the main quarry) would grind to a halt," he said

If the level of capping on West Falkland is to be increased, additional truck capacity will be needed from the private sector and it is likely that longer term contracts will need to be offered to enable recovery of investment, Mr Hancox told the Transport Advisory Committee on Monday. "We need to be looking at it now-thinking how to move ahead," he concluded.

£2.5 million wiped from FIG investments

THE global stock market crash has resulted in some two and a half million pounds being wiped off the value of the funds managed for the Falkland Islands Government by investment fund managers HSBC and Newton in October, Standing Finance Committee (SFC) heard on Friday.

Hardest hit was the Retirement Pensions Fund, managed by HSBC, which suffered a 9% drop in value during the last quarter. This fund had performed well below industry performance benchmarks. Financial Secretary, Keith Padgett, told members, however it was mainly invested in stocks which were expected to grow in value in the long term and therefore should recover.

Questions were asked by members of the committee about the performance of HSBC's investment managers as compared with those of Newton. It was felt that HSBC's relatively disappointing performance arose from the wrong mix between shares and bonds, but the Financial Secretary suggested that it might be imprudent to consider replacing them as investment managers until "the dust" from the present global situation "had settled."

Earlier, the committee had considered a report on the Stanley Retail Price Index, which showed an increase of 4.3%, during the quarter ending September 30, 2008.

In what constituted the biggest quarterly increase of the year, kerosene for heating and electricity, stood out as the fastest risers, accounting for 1.2% between them.

Later that day in Legislative Council, when introducing the motion in support of the Green Paper on the 209/10 Budget, Cllr Mike Summers described the current rate of inflation in the Falk-lands as "very substantial," commenting that the unusual expectation of both high inflation and low interest rates, would exascerbate many of the difficulties which would be felt by both the country and by individuals.

Ilen restoration project gets underway in Ireland

Mr O'Brien had arrived in the Falklands in 1924, during a circumnavigation of the world, south of the three stormy capes, on his earlier yacht, Saorse, built by the same yard.

At the time, according to information kindly supplied by FIG Archivist, Jane Cameron, the Falkland Islands Company (FIC) were looking for a new vessel, particularly for working the many islands they owned. Apparently. Saorse, which was based on the lines of the sort of Irish fishing smack on which Mr O'Brien had served as a gun runner during the Irish Civil War, caught their eye.

When plans already in hand to have a new vessel built by the Hobbs yard in Punta Arenas fell through, due to the projected cost of £4,200 being considered too high by the FIC Board, a chance visit by Mr O'Brien to the FIC's London office in order to change a Falklands Islands pound note, led

to him being invited to quote for the job.

Mr O'Brien's quotation of £1,150 for the construction of a vessel 'as specified and approved by Captain Roberts' (the FIC's Marine Superintendent) was accepted at a Director's meeting on September 14, 1925. The Chairman of the FIC Board at the time was Rhodes Cobb, cousin of the famous F E Cobb, who had retired as chairman in 1922.

When the *Ilen* was launched in 1926, Mr O'Brien sailed her to the Falkland Islands himself, with a crew of two, making a very swift passage.

For the next seventy years, *Ilen* served around the Falklands, mainly as an FIC farm boat, until her then owner, Paul Ellis, who was using her as a diving platform, was persuaded to sell *Ilen* to a visiting Irishman, Mr Gary McMahon, who recognised her significance and wished to restore her.

Following an emotional return to Ireland from the Falklands in 1998, the *Ilen* has waited at her birth place to be returned to her former sailing glory.

Now this process to restore what project leader Gary McMahon calls "the sole surviving example of Ireland's once thriving maritime culture" has begun. Ilen is being refitted in a series of week-long workshops under the expert guidance of Mr Liam Hegarty, his brother, Mr John Hegarty and Mr Fachtna O'Sullivan, three of the few remaining traditional shipwrights in Ireland today.

The refitting of this eighty-two year old vessel is now being used as an opportunity for people to experience first-hand the skills of wooden boat building.

Court news

HAVING heard the liquidator of Island Shipping, Mr Copp, give evidence in court, the Honourable Chief Justice Christopher Gardner dispensed with the settlement of a list of contributories of the company and approved the proposed scheme, in principle.

Mr Copp had proposed a distribution which would result in the preferential creditors recovering in full and the ordinary unsecured creditors receiving a sum in the region of 15.7 pence in the pound.

The Chief Justice stated that he was satisfied that in all the circumstances, this scheme was in the best interests of creditors and would minimise further delay.

He also taxed the liquidator's costs and disbursements including that in relation to obtaining legal advice, in the total sum to the time of completion, of £45,500.

Verified applications would then be submitted to the Principal Immigration Officer for final approval. Reasons for such refusals would have to be given and appeal to the Governor allowed, Cllr Rendell explained.

Before the paper would be ready for presentation, Cllr Mike Rendell said that further work was still to be undertaken on the handling of family applications (including dependant relatives, spouses, partners) and retirement, investor and other categories outside the general migrants' scheme.

There was a need also to consider applications from people living and working at the Mount Pleasant Complex, including whether time spent there should be counted as points-earning.

Breast screening to go ahead

EXECUTIVE Council have agreed to top up the £15,000 raised by the Cancer Support and Awareness Trust to provide the £40,000 necessary to enable a trial breast screening programme which might result in the development of a national breast cancer screening service for the Falkland Islands.

This trial will involve a mobile mammography unit (currently being used by the Chilean authorities to provide mammography in remote areas such as Easter Island), being shipped from Punta Arenas, along with an ultrasound unit and an ultrasound guided biopsy system.

Shipment will be timed to coincide with a 2-3 week visit in February 2009 by the lead clinician in the breast screening department at the Clinica Alemana in Chile, who believes that she can screen and biopsy, if necessary, up to 450 women in one visit.

Chief Medical Officer (CMO), Roger Diggle, told members that the surgical advisor recommended that the age range for mammographic screening here should be between 47 and 73.

Members agreed to the CMO's proposal that following this visit a further paper analysing its success should be brought forward before decisions were taken on the viability of a long-term screening programme.

It was further agreed that with the exception of those on benefits or pensions, the charge per person for screening would be £20.

Government to assist with Camp mortgages

A recommendation that government should guarantee 50% of the mortgage value on new house construction and house modernisation in Camp where Standard Chartered Bank (SCB) is providing the mortgage, has been approved.

Until now SCB has been unwilling to provide mortgages for Camp properties, principally because they believed that the forced sale value in the event of default could be little or nothing for a remote property, said Councillor Rendell.

In order to facilitate building development in Camp, SCB had come up with this proposal, which, whilst safeguarding their risk, will allow mortgages to be provided and therefore development to take place.

Members acknowledged this development as being "absolutely essential."

Smashing time not the eggs-act truth

STANLEY Dairy Manager, Kevin Reynolds, this week denied rumours of the destruction of thousands of saleable eggs at Stanley Dairy, thereby threatening an egg shortage.

Mr Reynolds confirmed that some imported eggs had been used for pig feed. These were eggs which had arrived just as fresh eggs from Camp were becoming available. They were well past their sell-by date, when fed to the pigs.

It was confirmed in ExCo last week that Stanley Dairy would remain as a going concern, whilst a small project group examined all options for its future.

Total coverage for mobiles phones 'unlikely'

Councillor John Birmingham asked Cllr Mike Rendell to explain the feasibility and approximate costs of introducing an Islands-wide mobile phone network.

Cllr Rendell replied that Government was aware that the extension of the mobile network to Camp was seen by many to be important for social, business and safety rea-

Discussions regarding the extension of the mobile network to other locations in Camp had been taking place with Cable and Wireless for some time, particularly as the rollout of the new Camp infrastructure provided some new opportunities for the location of mobile equipment, he said.

It was very doubtful, that total coverage of the Falklands, including all the outer islands, could ever be achieved, Cllr Rendell advised and pointed out that total coverage was not even possible in the UK.

Some preliminary consideration had been given to extending coverage to the majority of the main settlements and road networks. There were a lot of variables and power was a high requirement of mobile systems, thereby substantially increasing operating costs, apart from the capital outlay, he said.

'In very approximate terms it could cost anything between £1m and £1.5m to extend mobile coverage widely throughout Camp and involve between six and ten new sites.

"The central area of West Falkland would be very difficult to cover and at least one completely new major site, including 24 hour power with diesel backup, would need to be built. This was because of the existence of imposing mountain ranges, Cllr Rendell explained.

In order to commence consideration of a programme to extend mobile coverage to Camp, Cable and Wireless had been asked to provide FIG with a proposal and outline costings for the establishment of mobile stations on Sussex Mountain and Malo Hills. These locations were chosen because they would provide coverage to large areas of the most often travelled parts of Camp and provide infill to existing coverage from Stations in Stanley and Mount Pleasant Peak

Proposals from Cable and Wireless had now been received, said Cllr Rendell, which also contained an option to provide a repeater node at Port Howard, so that both sides of the ferry route would be covered. Coverage predictions included much of the North Camp roads infrastructure, Teal Inlet and Estancia, the track to Volunteer Point, San Carlos, New Haven and much of Lafonia.

For reasons of commercial confidentiality during evaluation by the Government, Clir Rendell could not reveal the estimated cost of this

A paper would be presented to Executive Council in due course after consultation with other organisations, he said.

Even if agreed, work on extending the mobile network could not realistically commence until the third quarter of 2009, he concluded.

Medical consultant visits unchanged

ASKED by Cllr John Birmingham to confirm that there had been no reduction in the number of medical consultants visiting the Islands in this financial year and that those consultants who normally make more than one visit would continue to do so, Councillor Janet Robertson replied that she was pleased to confirm that the number of medical consultants' planned visits to the Islands in this financial year remained unchanged.

Outline plans also existed for visits of two additional consultants: an ophthalmologist and an oral surgeon, she said.

While giving an assurance that every effort would be made to ensure that consultants who made more than one visit to the Islands in a year would continue to do so, Cllr Robertson said that the visits were normally arranged according to clinical demand. It should be noted, she added, that all visiting consultants for the next financial year would be reviewed as part of the whole budget process.

Councillor Mike Summers asked what arrangements were made for advising the public of the visits of consultants, observing that consultants seemed to come and go without the majority of people being aware of their pres-

Cllr Robertson said that she could not say for sure how the visits of consultants were made public, but that it was her understanding that referrals to visiting specialists were made usually by the local medical doctors and therefore they were probably not widely advertised.

Airstrips for remote islands progress update

COUNCILLOR John Birmingham was asked by Councillor Ian Hansen to advise on the current progress at the airstrips at New Island, Beaver Island and Westpoint Island, to comment on the costs incurred on surveys and works undertaken to date and to indicate the final costs expected before these strips might be operational again.

Cllr Birmingham, who holds the Transport Portfolio, advised that initial surveys had been carried out at the three airstrips, by an assessment team consisting of representatives from Stanley Airport, FIGAS, Civil Aviation Department, the Public Works Highways Section and the PWD Design Office.

He said that the preliminary survey suggested that all three air strips could be lengthened, but that a considerable amount of earthworks

would be necessary in each case.

"To be able to provide a reasonable and accurate cost of completing works to lengthen the strips, the PWD now needed to make a more detailed assessment of each airstrip, with the aid of earth moving equipment. The first attempt to do this had had to be abandoned, due to unsuitable weather conditions for the Concordia Bay.

It was yet to be decided when a second attempt would be made, Cllr Birmingham told his colleagues, adding that it was necessary to interrupt the Concordia Bay's scheduled service to allow time to get the equipment on to the islands.

He advised that the costs incurred to carry out the survey work to date had been £9,650. Additional costs of up to £20,000 were anticipated to enable the full assessments

to be carried out. Only then would it be possible to estimate the costs of the required works to lengthen the airstrips.

Asked whether there was con-

cern that the cost of this operation might spiral to a point where the upgrading of these airstrips might not be considered worthwhile, Cllr Birmingham replied that this would be a political judgement.

Questioned whether any consideration had been given to reverting to servicing those islands, using the restricted load limits and takeoff factors that were previously in use, Cllr Birmingham replied that the use of all airstrips was regulated by Air Safety Support International (ASSI) and it was under their regulations that FIGAS was operating at the moment.

Landholdings Board ordinance amended

AN amendment to the Falkland Landholdings Corporation Ordinance 2000, was agreed by Executive Council to widen the scope of those who might be elected.

It now includes Stanley residents, who might have relevant experience, but who were excluded by the wording of Section 4(1)(f), which referred to "two persons elected from among their number by the farming community...

The wording "two members of the public appointed by the Governor" has now been substituted.

Rural energy scheme to be maintained

THE FIDC's Rural Energy Extension Scheme, Home Pack Power Scheme and Power Upgrade Scheme are to be discontinued and the original scheme, the Rural Energy Grant Scheme, is to be maintained but with the principal modification being that the applicant will have to be engaged in a commercial enterprise based in the Camp.

Making this decision on Thursday, Executive Council members also agreed that those currently on the old schemes should be allowed to complete their installations.

Ocean 8 oil removal a 'reasonable outcome'

EXCO received a report on the oil removal operation on the Ocean 8. While it was noted that there was still a considerable amount of oil that was apparently unaccounted for, it was concluded that the salvage team had done as much as they could to retrieve all fuel from the tanks and that a reasonable outcome had been achieved.

The Chief Executive advised that the results of his enquiry into the whole incident, including lessons learnt, would be released in January 2009.

No plans to computerise airport procedures

SEVERAL councillors commented on aspects of the immigration and emigration procedures at Mount Pleasant Airport for the Saturday LAN flight, which struck them as unnecessarily cumbersome.

In response to a question posed by Cllr John Birmingham, Cllr Mike Rendell denied the existence of any plans to computerise the immigration and emigration procedures of the airport.

Councillor Rendell said that computersation had not been seriously considered as a high priority at this current time, by reason of the fact that the Immigration Policy Working Group and immigration staff were fully engaged in the completion of a comprehensive immigration policy review.

A major overhaul of the existing immigration computer database was also currently in progress.

Green Paper on the budget debate and motion for adjournment speeches

"THIS House notes with concern the continuing world financial crisis and the inevitable affect it will have on the Falkland Islands. It commends the Government Green Paper on the Budget for 2009/2010 and invites all members of the public to join the debate on our future budget strategy,"

The above resolution came before Legislative Council on Friday, proposed by Councillor Mike Summers and seconded by Councillor Janet Robertson.

Pointing to recent inflation figures, the lowering of interest rates and the losses in value suffered by the government's consolidated fund as indicators of how the current global financial crisis would impact on the Falkland Islands, Cllr Summers warned that passing a balanced budget in May next year would involve making some difficult decisions about the level of public service that could be afforded.

The purpose of the Green Paper, said Cllr Summers, was to stimulate informed debate about possible solutions to the financial problems facing the Islands.

Cllr Summers argued against simply cutting government expenditure across the board: this would reduce the size of the economy and lead to the kind of recession being experienced around the world, he said and pointed out that the Green Paper demonstrated that government had

been reducing its annual recurrent expenditure in real terms, for the last five years.

Investment in economic growth and infrastructure was crucial, said Cllr Summers, if the effect of ever decreasing income from the Hex fishery was to be discounted, which was one of the aims of the government's medium-term financial plan and part of the long-term budget strategy.

Reducing overseas imports and, where possible, the purchase of services from overseas, should be a prime target, said Cllr Summers, as this would narrow the gap between revenue and expenditure, without having a harmful effect on the community as a whole.

Cllr Summers was not convinced that lowering tax rates would, "miraculously increase investment and increase the size of the economy," as some people had suggested and called for any suggestions regarding budget strategy to be, "evidence-based."

Supporting the motion, Councillor Janet Robertson accepted Cllr Summers' overview of the situation, as did most of the subsequent speakers.

Cllr Robertson described the Green Paper as rising out of LegCo's feeling that the public should participate more in the budget process, just as much as from the current economic crisis. It was, she said, "a fairly new way to approach things."

It was worth pointing out, said

Cllr Robertson, that the examples given in the Green Paper of areas where government's expenditure might be axed, were simply examples.

This was a point taken up subsequently by Councillor Richard Cockwell, who wanted to reassure people that the proposals in the Green Paper and reprinted on the front page of last week's *Penguin News*, were just suggestions, which would not necessarily be acted upon, but would have to be looked at.

Councillor Robertson stated that it was important that in making any reductions in services, concern should be demonstrated for the effects on the whole community and not just specific parts of it.

Praising the high standard of the Islands' Health Service, but pointing out there were few countries in the world where such a service was free. Cllr Robertson said that now was definitely the time to examine ways that contributions to its cost could be made. The current review of the financing of the Health Service would obviously have to be as wide ranging as possible.

Not dismissing the idea of tax incentives, particularly in the context of the rural development strategy, but agreeing with Councillor Summers' point that the last review of tax did not visibly lead to

great increase in investments. Cllr Robertson said tax breaks would have to be specific and have a certain principle aim in mind.

There was no major disagreement with anything said by either the proposer or seconder of the motion supporting the Green Paper on the Budget, by any of the subsequent speakers; all agreed that it would be necessary to make difficult decisions, but no one offered any immediate suggestions.

Councillor Birmingham said that he would not have any problem with raising taxes, making the observation that the countries with the highest rates of taxation also enjoyed the best public services.

As might be expected, the Camp representatives, Cllrs Hansen, Stevens and Rendell, were particularly keen to defend the abattoir against any suggestion of closure, because of the effect that this would have on the rural economy and both Cllrs Hansen and Rendell saw the need for government to consider means-testing in relation to service provision.

Most members referred to the innovative and inclusive nature of the process, which they hoped the Green Paper on the Budget would stimulate. It was "a new road," said Cllr Rendell, who referred to, "decisions made in the last ten minutes" of previous budget sessions.

Cable and Wireless Camp phone charges to reflect the quality?

CAMP telecommunications supplied by Cable and Wireless are at present at an all time low, said Councillor Ian Hansen.

He was the first of several councillors to comment on the quality of communications to those parts of the Camp which are still not reached by the new Cable and Wireless system, saying that it was, "...possibly the worst service that we have ever received." He expressed the hope that charges for those subscribers still on the old system could be reduced to reflect its "diabolical" quality.

Councillor Richard Stevens, began by praising the impressive work being done, often in, "appalling conditions" on mountain tops, by those installing the new telephone infrastructure, contrasting this excellence with the discontent at worsening communications being experienced by those yet to re-

ceive the benefits of the upgrade.

While finding himself reluctant to criticise Cable and Wireless completely, because they were clearly working so hard to extend the upgrade, which was working well for those who had received it. Cllr Stevens agreed that there should be some accommodation for the people whose services are going down.

Councillor Mike Rendell, also agreed that it did seem that Cable and Wireless had possibly. "taken their eye off the ball"in terms of the old system and had put all their efforts into the new system, which thought was probably, "almost inevitable."

On a more positive note, he reported that the upgrade for Camp telephones was on budget, with nearly all the civil works completed and reason to believe that it would be completed on time, by the end of March 2009.

No need for a New Haven on West Falkland

REFERRING to the official opening of the New Haven ferry terminal, Cllr Rendell said that it was, "very pleasing to see everybody coming together"

There was clearly some more work that would need to be done at Port Howard but it would not be necessary to have another New Haven on West Falkland, he said.

Picking up on the spelling mistakes discovered on the original plaque at New Haven, Cllr Rendell said that mention had also been omitted of some important contributors to the ferry port project, among them Bonner's Haulage, who had worked behind the scenes pouring concrete.

Cllr Summers thanks the UK's UN Ambassador, John Sawyer

COUNCILLOR Mike Summers said he would like the House to send its formal thanks and congratulations to the UK's UN Ambassador in New York, John Sawyer, who, with his team, denied an attempt by Argentina and Spain to propose in the United Nations 4th Committee an amendment, which would have denied the right of self-determination to those countries, where there is a sovereignty conflict.

The defeat of this amendment by a majority of about 60 to 40 was, said Cllr Summers, "a tremendous result," which supported the view that has been reiterated year on year in LegCo, that the right to self determination is a universal right, that can't be compromised.

Cllr Summers declared that on no occasion had it ever been said in the United Nations that the Falkland Islands should be restricted in its development, either democratically or economically and concluded: "The view that the Argentines would like to put forward that the Falklands don't have that right to continue development without their permission is utter

nonsense. They have wasted something like 26 years now in navel gazing and wasted protests over the issue of self determination for the people of the Falklands

"It's time that they moved on and understood that the world will not tolerate bullies and will not tolerate people who simply go land grabbing just to satisfy their own internal problems," he said.

Constitution

Accepting praise from his fellow councillors as Chair of the Select Committee on the Constitution, Councillor Mike Summers said that it had been a long process, "but actually a very enjoyable and important one."

The new Falkland Islands Constitution was passed by the Privy Council earlier this month and will come into effect on January 1, 2009.

Cllr Summers expressed the hope that the Constitution would be of benefit to the community in the future and that it would not be another 14 years before it was revised again. The intention was that it should be a live document and be continually reviewed, he said.

Falklands 25 - The Pilgrimage in pictures


STANLEY photographer, Norman Clark, has produced what may be the ultimate souvenir of the SAMA, Falklands 25 pilgrimage.



INSPIRED by the beauty of the Antarctic in 2005, when she competed in the Antarctic Marathon on King George Island, Lieutant Colonel Ingrid Hall and a group of explorers have retraced Shackleton's footsteps across South Georgia.

Ingrid had first seen the beauty of South Georgia, when dropping supplies from a Hercules aircraft to troops based in Grytviken while she was based in the Falk-lands in 1992.

Accompanied by joint leader Stephen Tetlow, the expedition took 18 months to plan but once under way was, just like the origi-nal traverse, blessed with good weather.

The rest of the group were made up of Simon Kewley, an outdoor enthusiast who has spent most of his life farming in Dorset; former soldier Keith Young, who along with four others completed the first recorded row of the Irish Sea in 1989; Lyster Denny, who spent five years at sea with his wife and young family and Stephen Venables, a mountaineer, writer, broadcaster and public speaker, who was the first Briton to climb Everest without supplementary

oxygen.

Completing the group and providing the transport to and from South Georgia was legendary yachtsman Skip Novak, who is best known for his participation in four Whitbread Round the World yacht races. Skip is a regular visitor to South Georgia and has been involved in a number of climbing expeditions in the area.

The purpose built yacht Pelagic Australis was used for the expedition, with Islander Chris Harris as part of the crew for the second.

The group were also raising funds for worthy causes. Ingrid said that more than £30,000 had been raised to date for several charities, including Help for Heroes, Teenage Cancer Trust, Julia's House (a childrens' hospice in Dorset) and the Royal National Lifeboat Institution.

Watch Group go messing about in the river

MORE than 20 members of the Watch Group visited the Aquaculture Project at Moody Brook last week. The group was split into two and while half went to see the 'fish farm' in action, the others tried a spot of fishing and stream-dipping of their own, in the brook itself.

"It was a great opportunity for the children to see some very large specimens of brown trout in the breeding tanks as well as see some of the native zebra trout, which the project is aiming to breed," said group organiser, Ali Liddle, adding, "I think quite a few of the adult helpers would have been happy to do their fishing there rather than in Moody Brook, where specimens were a little harder to come

The children had great fun investigating the inhabitants of the



brook, which provides all of the water for Stanley and were surprised to see just what lives in their drinking water, before it reaches the filtration plant.

They caught a Falklands minnow, a couple of whitebait and a whole shoal of tiny jellyfish. Lurking under the rocks were some pre-

historic looking Caddis fly larvae in their protective cases made of grit and vegetation.

After the activities in the stream and in the poly tunnels the children walked to the reservoir, where they investigated the fish steps and the lake. "It was a lovely afternoon just, messing about in

the river' and despite a few wet feet I think a great time was had

by all," said Ali.
"Many thanks to Dan Fowler for taking time out of his weekend to show the children around the Aquaculture Project and to all the parent helpers who turned up and joined in with great enthusiasm."

Tragedy of Baby P

BRITAIN has been gripped by the story of Baby P. a tragically neglected and unloved infant who was killed by wicked people in conditions almost too awful to contemplate.

While you may have learned the essential facts from radio and TV, you have probably been spared the UK media's written stories. The papers examined the case in forensic detail and I have found it impossible to read some of their reports.

As we demanded posthumous justice for Baby P, the local authority, which should have placed him in safe care, went into all-round defence and denial, before seeing sense and admitting that it had failed

At just 18 months of age, Baby P could not have known that he was entitled to love and protection from adults. If only we had known in time. If only.

That is a futile line of thinking. The inconvenient truth is that in the UK, wealth and opportunities for education are so untairly distributed that there are pockets of society in which such turpitude can thrive and in which our caring institutions have little power. Bom

into such an underworld, the odds were stacked against the little boy.

Most of us in the chattering classes are well insulated against such nastiness. But we do read the papers, which is why some of us are being forced to ask an uncomfortable question. As we have accepted and enjoyed this unfair model of society, should we not accept at least some of the blame for the lonely death of Baby P? It is a question well worth asking.

I have always maintained that ships and boats are the only products of human industry that can have a heart. If you have ever tightened your grip on the nearest solid object and willed the vessel on which you are travelling to pull herself from the clutches of a solid green wall of water sweeping the foredeck, then you will know what I mean. 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Sea bed explorers make new discoveries around the Jason Islands



THE remotest northwest reaches of the Falklands hosted eleven unusual visitors last week. Normally home only to the likes of snails, sea stars, and sea lions, the marine environments of the Jason Islands were visited by an international team of marine and avian biologists. photographers, and divers.
The well-known expedition ves-

sel Golden Fleece, which is regularly chartered by such clients as the BBC Natural History Unit and National Geographic Society, served as a home, transport vehicle, and dive platform for the Shallow Marine Surveys Group (SMSG) expedition.

During the ten day cruise, the group took oceanographic measure-ments, collected and photographed previously undocumented species. measured the amount of substrate colonised by various organisms, and counted the number of animals found around different islands and in different habitat types. These observations add to the knowledge of the marine species in Falklands waters and facilitate comparisons between the fauna of the far northwest is-

lands and other locations. They also provide a baseline against which future observations, particularly of invasive organisms or species preferring warmer or cooler waters, can be compared.

Four special guests joined the core group of SMSG divers for the trip. Sarah Crofts from Falklands Conservation and Vernon Steen tackled the terrestrial portions of the data collection by recording shoreline habitat types and conducting seabird counts. After climbing through extensive and difficult terrain on Grand Jason, Steeple Jason, and Flat Jason, Sarah said: "The islands were spectacular. On Flat Jason we were practically tripping over Cobb's wrens. This was the first time anyone's surveyed coastal birds at these remote locations, and it was nice to see the health of the habitats and the abundance of these birds.'

Also joining the crew were Dr Claire Goodwin and Jen Jones from the National Museums, Northern Ireland. These two experts at sponge identification found over twenty species of these brightly colored ani-

mals that they will identify using laboratory facilities in the UK. The resulting species names and characteristics will be used by SMSG for future identification and development of an upcoming field guide.

The rest of the survey team logged over 80 dives at 13 different sites. Project officer Dr Karen Neely said the diving was fantastic, "We regularly had 15 metres of visibility, and the thick kelp forests and the diversity of life, particularly along the steep rock walls, were remark-

These environments yielded one of the highlights of the trip in the form of colourful slug-like nudibranchs and sea stars that have not been seen in the Falklands before and will next be identified to determine whether they might be species new to science. These walls also held a surprise in the form of a female Loligo squid laying her eggs. The observation and photos of this behavior are the first ever documented for this species.

The wildlife above the waves was also appreciated as the crew stopped by the world's largest black-browed albatross colony on Steeple Jason. An estimated 170,000 breeding pairs nest on this island, and most participants spent half a day ashore marvelling at the sheer abundance of these large birds.

Marine biologist Jude Brown was particularly struck by the scene: "It was a breathtaking sight - so many birds in such a small area. It feels like everywhere you look you can see an albatross, and the noise is overwhelming. Photos just can't do it justice," she said.

These prolific colonies and the abundance of other bird and mammal breeding areas speak to the iso-lation of the islands. Nevertheless, a high abundance of fishing-related debris was found on Flat Jason and an invasive tubeworm species was quite common at several sites.

"These sites were beautiful, but obviously there's a human influence even at these remote locations, all of which are protected either by FIG or Wildlife Conservation Society. It's great that we have some data about what's there now so that we can tell if the quantities of these invasive species and debris are increasing or decreasing in the future," said Karen

SMSG Chairman Dr Paul Brickle said the survey was amazing in that the Jasons are different oceanographically from the rest of the Islands. "Being stuck out on the western extremities of the Falklands. two current systems merge to produce some very productive waters. The influence of these two currents also results in a cold temperate environment as opposed to a more sub-Antarctic environment to the southeast of Stanley. This in turn leads to different species assemblages.

"The cruise has extended the range of marine baseline surveys in the Falklands that are important for the classification and mapping of habitats, as well as for comparison with other areas regionally. This is something the group can be very proud of.





National lady's slipper survey and photo competition

By Rebecca Upson, Plant Conservation Officer, FALKLANDS Conservation have launched a national survey and photo competition for one of 13 endemic species, the Falkland lady's slipper.

This species can be enjoyed in many places around the islands and that is why we would like to encourage everyone to get out and about this summer and attempt to find as many populations of this national treasure as possible. Such a large survey of a single species in one year will help to produce an up to date figure for the number of populations that exist across the islands and will allow us to better understand where it is thriving.

Lady's slippers get their name from the delicate shoe-like form of the enlarged lower lip of their flowers. There are between 300-400 species in the world and it has a natural distribution all the way from Patagonia up to central Mexico.

The Falklands lady's slipper has beautiful red and yellow flowers. Flowers are borne singly on a short (c. 12 cm) stalk arising from a basal rosette of very hairy, spoon-shaped leaves (c. 2 cm in length). The intricate shape and patterning of the flower make it one of the most stunning to be seen in the Islands. This species can be found growing on coastal slopes, amongst dwarf shrub heath on well-drained soil, as well as on ledges on rocky outcrops. It tends to occur in small populations and, although widespread, is scarce.

The best time to see the lady's slipper in flower is in November



and December, but flowers can still sometimes be spotted as late as February. One plant is currently in flower in the population closest to Stanley, on Cape Pembroke.

In contrast to the majority of Patagonian species, the Falkland Islands' lady's slipper and one of its South American relatives, Calceolaria uniflora, have a striking white and fleshy appendage folded against the outside of the lower flower lip. Studies on steppe populations of the South American relative have shown that a common Patagonian bird, the seedsnipe (Thinocorus rumicivorus), pecks off and eats these appendages. Whilst removing its sugary meal the birds accidentally transfer pollen between flowers. This case of bird pollination is so far the only one recorded for lady's slippers but the similarity in flower structure with the Falklands endemic species strongly suggests a similar pollinating system here. The seedsnipe has been sighted in the Falklands but is thought to be an occasional vagrant and so it is likely that another bird species is the main pollinator of *C. fothereillii*.

Recording forms are currently available at the FC office, Post Office and Seafish Chandlery. What better way to record your botanical find, than to take a beautiful photo?

Competition

Send in your best shot to Falklands Conservation for entry into a photography competition. The winner will be announced in March next year and will have their photo printed and displayed in the Jetty Visitor Centre as well as appearing in the *Penguin News* and receiving a copy of Ali Liddle's book *Plants of the Falkland Islands*.


It is clear that the Falklands lady's slipper is an endemic species that certainly deserves to be known and studied, with many interesting questions about its biology remaining unanswered.

We look forward to new research and new sightings of these fascinating plants and perhaps one of you will be the first person ever to observe a bird pecking away the food body from its flower.

Charity dinner with a Victorian flavour

THE Cancer Support and Awareness Trust recently held a dinner with a twist at Government House.

Falkland Islands Government housing - the points system explained

APPLICATIONS for FIG housing are assessed using a points system to ensure fairness and consistency when deciding who has the greatest need to be housed.

Applications are submitted to the Housing Officer in the Public Works Department. Stanley, for assessment using the following table

CHILDREN: 10 points per child (5 per child where there is joint custody and child does not reside with the applicant)

HOUSE-SHARE: 10 points for couple/marriage. 5 points for single

OVER-CROWDING: 5 points per couple or individual not having their own bedroom

DEADLINE: 10 points if applicant has an eviction date or is being made homeless for reasons beyond their control

MEDICAL NEEDS: Assessed by the Chief Medical Officer and scoring 0-30 points. If you wish a medical condition to be taken into account, you must contact your Doctor and ask them for an assessment to be made and for the results to be disclosed to the Housing Officer.

SOCIAL NEEDS: Assessed by Team Leader Social Welfare scoring 0 – 30 points. If you believe there are social reasons to house you, please ask for an assessment to be made and for the results to be disclosed to the Housing Officer

RESIDENT RETURNING AS QUALIFIED PROFESSIONAL: 15 points. Proof is required (such as a degree certificate)

PAST RECORD: Deduct up to 10 points if applicant or their partner has a record as an FIG debtor or a history of damaging FIG property

SAVINGS: Recent bank statements must be submitted for each member of the applicants household including children. First £10,000 no points, deduct 1point per £1,000 held thereafter.

EMPLOYMENT: For combined income higher than £13,000 deduct 1 point/£1K over (previous to Aug 08 was £12K)

TRANSFER: 10 points subject to satisfactory inspection - relinquishing another FIG resource to reallocate

AGE: I point for each year after 40th birthday. These points are not assigned to transfer applications.

There are also certain eligibility criteria to be met in order to apply to be considered for FIG housing:

Applicants must be 18 years of age, and

Enjoy Falkland Islands Status, or

Have held a Permanent Residence Permit for a minimum of

Applicants are often called in to the Housing Office for an informal interview so that information given in their application can be clarified or additional information requested if necessary.

FIG accommodation is in high demand at present and availability is scant, so we must take into account every aspect of an individual's or family's circumstances when deciding how to prioritise allocations. This means that the application form is comprehensive these days and may appear to be very invasive to some applicants; however, the information collected is used in the strictest of confidence.

Applications are scored using the above points system. The total points scored will determine the applicant's place on the list of persons to be considered to be housed. The person with the highest score overall has the greatest priority; however, we also take into account the size and type of property that applicants require. For example, if the applicant at the top of the list requires a 3-bed property, but the next available property is a 1-bed we will look down the list to find the highest scoring applicant requiring a 1-bed property.

One million pounds down the drain?

JUST two years after the dust settled in the Police department and confidence in the force was being restored, the population have been rocked by the revelation that approximately 23 kilos of cocaine had been mislaid in the Police Station.

The 29 packets of cocaine, totalling more than 30 kilos and estimated to have a street value of more than a million pounds, were seized by authorities in the Falkland Islands, from the fishing vessel *Ventura* on October 30 and were secured as evidence in a double locked cell at the Stanley Police Station pending a court hearing.

Two Spanish citizens were arrested and charged with importing the drugs. Both are are being held in custody at the jail within the Police Station.

A Government House spokesperson said that a check of the cell on Tuesday had revealed that 23 of the packets were missing and a search of the premisies found evi-

dence of one discarded bag and packaging from some of the miss-

ing packets.

His Excellency the Governor has asked Provost Marshall of the Joint Service Police and Security Unit (JSPSU) at Mount Pleasant Complex to carry out an investigation into the loss. A full enquiry into the circumstances surround-

ing the incident will be convened

Two years ago two police officers were found guilty of criminal offences: morale within the force was at an all time low, while

public confidence in the service was severely shaken.

Former Detective Sergeant Jonathon Butler, one of the two officers involved, commented on Thursday that he found it "quite incredible" that no Police Officers had been suspended, given that more than £800,000 of property had been lost while in their care. It displayed double standards, he said

A Government House spokesperson confirmed that there had not been any suspensions within the police force.

As part of the investigation into the loss of the drugs, with which the Royal Falkland Islands Police are cooperating fully, said the spokesperson, the homes of some police officers have been searched using the RAF police dog.

On Wednesday afternoon Public Works Department employees were tasked to check the drains leading from the Police Station and take samples, indicating that there was a possibility that the drugs had been disposed of from within the Police Station.

That the drugs could have been taken from the Falklands is also a prospect and passengers on the North bound airbridge confirmed that they were subjected to a thorough search at Brize Norton, where sniffer dogs were at work checking baggage and travellers.

Meanwhile, reliable sources have revealed that all the cells have an approximate three inch gap under the door and more concerning, that the extensive armoury held by the Royal Falkland Islands Police was contained within the same cell from which the drugs were removed.

While the matter is under investigation, Superintendent Paul Elliott is unable to comment and Government House First Secretary Paul Martinez said there would be, "no further comment, pending the outcome of the investigation."

Falklands minefield clearance to begin immediately

JOHN Dunean, British Ambassador for Multilateral Arms Control and Disarmament, announced in the Ottawa Convention meetings in Geneva on Wednesday, that the UK had decided to begin the clearing of three minefields in the Falklands "immediately."

This announcement appeared to be in contrast to expectations previously reported in the British media, that the British Government would be seeking a ten year extension on the fulfilment of their obligation in the Falklands, under the terms of the Ottawa Convention on land mines, of which it is a signatory.

The Ambassador told the Convention that an independant feasibility study completed last year, had suggested a trial period to discover whether it was in fact possible to clear all the mines within ten years.

Commenting that nobody really knew the answer - though the feasability study indicated that the nature of the terrain and the isolation of the Falklands, was always going to make mine clearance both difficult and expensive - the Ambassador said that the British Government had decided that work should start immediately.

In a BBC interview earlier in the week, Councillor Mike Summers

had expressed the previously stated view of the Falkland Islands Government (FIG), which is thought to be supported by an overwhelming majority of the Islands' inhabitants.

"If the money they were thinking of spending here could be better spent in one of those areas where children are still getting their legs blown off, we would be more than happy with that," he said. The British Government came

The British Government came under fire from anti-mine campaigners last week, over what is perceived as their lack of action to clear from the Falkland Islands the estimated 20,000 landmines laid there by Argentine forces in 1982. This should have been accomplished by March

of next year. Campaigners are reported as having argued that the failure of Britain to meet its obligations would damage its international reputation and could encourage other countries also to default.

I MISSED the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Service's marathon revue of the first three years of the life of this Legislative Council when it was broadcast and consequently, have just had to spend one and a half hours listening to it on headphones. This experience has left me with a headache.

some mixed emotions and some big questions.

To deal first with the mixed emotions, what struck me most about the responses of the eight councillors interviewed by Stacy Bragger, was their obvious sincerity. Even occasionally vocal critic of the Government, Roger Spink, began his contribution to the programme by describing them as, "well-meaning people with a difficult job to do." This left me feeling slightly guilty about any time when *Penguin News* might have yielded to the ever present temptation to knock or mock councillors; if they haven't done a good job, either individually or collectively, it is clearly not from any lack

of trying.

This led me inevitably to question why this group of eight concerned, serious folk, described by one of their number as, "a good bunch to work with" and by another as, "very positive, with a can-do attitude," should be described by another contributor to the same programme as, "possibly the most unpopular council at this stage in the proceedings" and, "totally out of

touch with people.'

If the above is true, is this gap between how the council perceive them-selves and how they are viewed by their constituents, simply, as Councillor Robertson suggested, a matter of poor public relations? Could it be that after demanding change at the last election, the public have either not perceived any change, or have not liked the changes there have been? More worryingly, could it be that, despite the new Constitution, there is still something intrinsic in our system of government which brings about the phenomenon that Councillor Summers mentioned: where councillors represent the people, right up until the moment they are elected, when suddenly they don't seem to represent anyone, anymore?

I think that there is evidence for the latter view and that the problem springs from the invidious nature of the councillors' job: part-time, poorly rewarded and 'hung out to dry,' between the often ill-informed demands of public opinion and the workings of a full-time administration, over which they have little direct control and for which, as portfolio holders, but not

ministers, they have no real responsibility

In these circumstances, is it any wonder that what appears at election time to be a diverse group of approachable, communicative individuals with distinct points of view, soon appears to be a tight and defensive caucus, talking in what often seems to be code and listening only to itself

Unpalatable as it may be, particularly in this time of financial uncertainty, surely the day is fast approaching when we must have full-time councillors, with some of them ministers, leading the major government departments and working with and within them, rather than simply bleating from the sidelines in frustration, or snapping at their heels.

Darwin bicentenary

FEBRUARY next year marks two hundred years since the birth of Charles Darwin, universally recognised as one of the most influential scientists there has ever been

Darwin's book, On the Origin of the Species by Means of Natural Selection, published in 1859, laid down the foundations of the theory of evolution and shocked the European, Christian world.

Darwin's theory was that rather than being created by God in seven days, all living things had evolved over millions of years, by means of what he called "natural selection." sometimes referred to as the survival of the fittest. Evidence for this view was gathered during the five year long scientific voyage he made aboard HMS Beagle, under the command

of Captain Robert Fitzroy.

Whilst some parts of this voyage, such as his exploration of the Galapagos Islands, are well known and much celebrated, Darwin's time in the Falkland Islands is often overlooked. Despite an early description of the Falklands as, "an undulating land, with a desolate and wretched aspect" he made at least one extended journey on horseback, in the company of gauchos from Port Louis and made many scientific ob-

That the Beagle brought Darwin

and Fitzroy to the Falklands during this voyage is evidenced, not only by their names being given to two of the Islands' principal settlements, but also by names given by Fitzroy to many of the physical features noted during the making of charts, which was one of the expedition's principal purposes. An example of this is the Wickham Heights, named after John Clements Wickham, who was a lieutenant on the Beagle.

Darwin's bi-centenary will be marked around the world, probably in all of the many countries he visited. Publishers in South America and elsewhere are bringing out special editions and maps, the great man's birth place, Down House near Shrewsbury, has been declared a world heritage site and nearing completion is a reconstruction of HMS Beagle, in which it is planned a team of professors, scientists and students will follow the route taken by Darwin and Fitzroy

In the Falklands, so far, the celebrations planned are a little lower key: Phil Stone of the British Geological Society and a frequent visitor to the Falklands, will be delivering an illustrated talk entitled 'Darwin and the Falkland Islands' on December 5, at 5.30pm in the Geography room of the Community School

The museum, which has collaborated with Mr Stone to produce a commemorative booklet, now on sale in their shop, is also planning a short-term exhibition early next

This exhibition will focus on Charles Darwin's time in the Islands, but will also mention other naturalists, who have visited the Falklands, such as Darwin's friend, the botanist, Joseph Dalton Hooker, whose name was given to the point at the south end of Surf

Post Mistress, Moira Eccles, confirmed that a Darwin stamp issue was on her calendar. Though still at the concept stage, a release in February or March was hoped for.

There has also been some discussion between the Treasury and a mint regarding a commemorative coin issue, but Penguin News was unable to obtain confirmation of any decision having been made.

Sherilee wins Commonwealth essay prize

CONGRATULATIONS to Sherilee Goss who was informed on Wednesday that she was the winner of the Commonwealth Essay Competition 2008 Falkland Islands Local Prize.

There were 6,700 entries this year from more than 1,350 schools around the Commonwealth. Local prizes are only awarded to entries which have been Commended or Highly Commended in the main Competition.

In his letter to the school, Dr Charles Kemp, the Chief Examiner, stated that Sheilee's response to the topic "Imagine what it would be like to live for a whole

day relying primarily on just one of your senses" was a powerful story and one which had engaged his attention.

Confirming to Penguin News that Councillors had been consulted by Government House, both on the application for an extension and on the possibility that mine-clearing would begin in three trial areas, Cllr Summers said that confirmation had been given only a few days ago, but that the news could not be released until after the official announcement by the Ambassador.

FIG's understanding was, said Cllr Summers, that the three minefields to be cleared would be at Sapper Hill, Goose Green and Fox

Bay.
The work was expected to begin in the second half of 2009, after preliminary work on logistics and possible environmental impact had been carried out. It was intended also that a working group should be set up on which local interests would be represented.

With regard to who would carry out the work, Councillors have been told that it would be put out to tender by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and that there would be something between ten and twelve, two-man teams involved. It is estimated that the work envisaged will take around nine or ten months to complete.

Advised to seek legal advice

NEW Senior Magistrate, Mr John Trevaskis, adjourned a case against Mrs Yvonne Jones for seven days, with the advice that she should seek legal advice before entering a plea, at her next appearance.

Mrs Jones, who was accused of having stolen groceries to a value of around £51 from the West Store, had first pleaded not guilty and then attempted to change her plea.

On the basis of what Mrs Jones had told the court, it would be quite improper to accept a plea of guilty at this stage, said Mr Trevaskis.

Death by reckless driving charge

THE case against Shaun May, who is charged with causing death by reckless driving, was adjourned until December 17, in order to give his defence counsel, Mr David Lang, time to receive advice from the United Kingdom.

1982 tribute 'Yomps'

'YOMP,' a Royal Marine word for a long march with full kit, came into the Falkland Islands vocabulary in 1982. Last week two yomps of a very different nature once again took place in the Falklands.

British Forces at Mount Pleasant organised a three day, seventy-five mile yomp from Port San Carlos to Stanley, as an act of remembrance, but also to raise money for Help for Heroes and SAMA

Ten teams of six, each loaded down with personal equipment and rifles, set out last Thursday on the seventy mile march.

The yompers spent the first night camping out at Hope Cottage Farm, and continued on to Estancia House for the second night, before marching on to Stanley.

As a sting in the tail, the marchers had to finish off with a shooting competition at Rookery Bay Range, before being allowed to rest their

Forty yompers finished the gruelling march, with the winning team being from the Resident Rapier Battery (20 Battery, 16 Regiment Royal Artillery) led by Sgt Paine.

A yomp of a slightly different kind is also taking place this week. Two former members of 45 Commando are also recreating the historic march. Chris Cook and Tony Hudson began their march earlier in the week and are expected to be on the Moody Brook Road into Stanley soon after 10am on Friday morning

Chris and Tony were on hand at the prize giving when the MPA finishers staggered into Stanley last Saturday, but have now gone off to

show the youngsters how it is done.

In a change from the last time they covered this ground, they will be carrying modern 24 hour ration packs, but apart from that the challenge remains very much as it ever was.

They are yomping for two charities, the Carlisle Eden Valley Hospice, for children suffering with Cancer and the Royal Marine Benevolent fund. As an act of remembrance they intend to stay out on Two Sisters on Thursday night.

INFANT and Junior School, head teacher, Nick Barrett and teacher Jackie Adams will return to the Falklands on Saturday after attending a Comenius conference in Alicante, Spain on behalf of IJS.

According to Mr Barrett, the aim of Comenius is to bring European schools closer together to enable them to be better informed about how each education system and school works.

A Comemius project entitled, "My story, your stories, our story" will culminate in the production of a website and a book in the four languages of the participating schools from Italy, Spain,

Hungary and the UK.

THE Director of Education, Barbara Booth is soon to leave and there are no immediate plans to replace her.

Drugs case adjourned

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Overseas medical funding explained

KEMH will arrange accommodation for a patient being referred and will cover the costs, but it is the patient's responsibility to pay for all other food and living costs, when overseas, said Dr Roger Diggle.

Penguin News asked the hospital to clarify what funding is provided for overseas medicals after it was suggested that patients were receiving different rates, depending on where in the UK they were being treated or staying.

Accommodation will only be funded from the date which KEMH nominates as the necessary arrival date, until the first available departure flight, after the patient is declared fit to fly and will normally be for bed and breakfast only. If the patient chooses to travel on an earlier or later flight, they will be responsible for any excess accommodation costs, Dr. Diggle explained.

"Where patients elect to stay with friends or relatives, the householder or patient may submit a claim for subsistence to the government office in London, or KEMH, at the rate of a maximum of £20 per night, however this must be agreed in advance with the Medical Treatment Overseas Administrator at KEMH."

Occasionally, patients who are staying in the UK for an extended period choose to visit friends or relatives elsewhere between appoint-

ments.

"If the patient cancels FIG accommodation in this situation, KEMH may agree to allow the patient to offset some of their travel costs against the savings on accommodation. However, the patient

must agree this in advance via FIGO, which will consult with KEMH, make and pay for their own travel arrangements, demonstrate there is a net saving to KEMH, produce receipts in order to support their claim for reimbursement and be aware that KEMH will not pay subsistence to any friends or relatives with whom a patient stays in such circumstances," he said. "The needs of each individual patient are assessed and the cheapest suitable accommodation is selected in all cases."

This may vary significantly, either because of the location, or because of the amount of notice possible for the accommodation, said

Dr Diggle.

"For instance in Southampton, where we send many patients, there is good quality accommodation available at £35 per person, per night, but this gets booked up well in advance, so that in a short notice situation more expensive accommodation is all that is available.

"Some patients are more seriously unwell, or are less able and have specific accommodation needs, which may result in requiring more expensive accommodation, said Dr Diggle, adding, "Long-term patients needing prolonged chemotherapy or radiotherapy require more homely accommodation than bed and breakfast or a hotel bedroom. Distance from the hospital or difficulty in accessing public transport may be other factors that determine the type of accommodation."

Patients are offered the option of staying with friends or relatives

or for their own reasons choose a hospital that is not one that KEMH normally use. In these circumstances they are given a contribution of £20 per night towards costs incurred.

Dr Diggle said it has been found that in some instances, referral to hospitals outside their normal catchment area resulted in more prolonged stays in the UK because the hospital is not used to receiving patients from overseas and therefore do not try to prioritise their progress through the system. "Also FIGO will not have researched best options in that location, so may not be able to obtain as good a deal as they do with organisations for accommodation in frequently used areas. Patients have to balance the benefit of being with or near relatives against these facts," he added.

Speeders fined

DANIEL Stewart and Christian Williams, both of Stanley, were fined in court this week for speeding on Davis Street East.

Mr Stewart, whose speed was recorded at 38mph, was fined £292 and Mr Williams, who admitted doing 37 mph, was fined £270. Both men were also made to pay £70 prosecution costs each.

Previous, recent speeding offences by both men were taken into account by the Senior Magistrate, when sentencing, as were their early pleas of guilt and the lack of aggravating circumstances.

'The Light Choice' to get in shape.

Q The world financial downturn was predictable. Why did Councillors not trim spending to a sustainable level earlier. which would have been less painful than making deeper cuts now?

A Councillor Andrea Clausen supplied the following answer.

Is the author of the question seriously suggesting that it was common knowledge to governments and the general public across the world that the US subprime mortgage situation and the subsequent global credit crunch were around the corner? If they are then I would have thought the news as it unravelled would actually not have been that newsworthy, because governments would, I expect, have already taken action to avoid what was to come.

It appears clear to me from the news coverage and in-depth analyses of what has happened over recent months, that it was not that obvious to the majority of people, including governments and financial regulators. I think it is fair to assume that if the financial crisis was common knowledge, then a global economic downturn would also have been predictable as they are so closely linked.

Regarding the Falkland Islands specifically we have over recent years been increasingly faced with juggling rising expectations from the general public for first class services and a gradual stagnation of revenues from our core economic activity. Although interestingly enough, a number of our surplus out turns can be directly attributed to higher than expected financial returns on investments. Concurrently our overall economy whilst not in bad shape has not necessary diversified as much or at a rate that would have better cushioned us for the national and international challenges that we now face.

As you will be aware, the current Council has been attempting to make cuts where possible and most likely not to affect our economic development. However, the lack of well-informed policy and financial advice has been a constraining factor facing Members and has resulted in a number of decisions being deferred, pending

further analysis.

We need to be sure that when we make decisions altering the way in which services are provided, that we do it in the fairest and most effective manner. Your readers will be aware that this subject is receiving the highest priority (Green Paper on Budget recently launched) and I would like to further appeal to members of the public to submit their comments on this subject, so that officers and Members can be guided in their deliberations.

Q Is it true that the Stanley Dairy are killing/selling all the hens? If so, why?

Does the consultation period on the budget Green Paper close before the other Green Papers are available? If so why?

Why is the public not being consulted on all the Green Papers in one go instead of on a piecemeal basis?

How will public response to the individual Green Papers be measured and will the response be published?

A Councillor Mike Summers responded to this series of questions. OFFICERS are currently working on four other green papers on budget and expenditure related subjects.

· Wealth Related Payments (Means Testing)

· Funding for Further and Higher Education

· Health Service Funding

Tax and Fiscal Policy

The first two will be ready in early December for discussion at the

December public meeting. The latter two papers will be available in January.

There is a great deal of work involved in each of these papers, as there was in the over-arching Budget Paper, and it is not possible to produce them all at the same time, nor is that likely to produce the best feedback and interaction with the widest possible cross-sec-tion of the public. Some people will take more specific interest in some areas and not others. We will have until the budget meetings in March to finalise the budget strategy and contributions can be taken until that time, though specific meetings will be set up to discuss particular topics; no dates have yet been set for the Health Service and Tax discus-

It was intended that the Budget Paper would set out the current situation with a number of broad questions for the public to consider and provide their reactions if they so wish. This will be used to guide the overall budget strategy. The more detailed papers deal with specific issues and proposals, each of which will contribute to the overall strat-

It is unlikely that any individual response to any of the papers will be published, but all responses will be taken into account in preparation of the final budget strategy.

Q WHY, when two top-up cards were bought on the same date, from the same shop and for the same value, when entered into two separate phones, do they give two completely different expiry dates - 23.01.09 and 24.11.09 respectively? When a top-up 'expires', why is it that there can still be credit on the phone but it cannot be used until a new top-up number is entered?

A Cable and Wireless Customer Services Manager, Thorogood provided the following response.

WHEN a 'top-up' is added to the phone not only does it add credit but it also extends the expiry date of the mobile. For example if £10 is added, the expiry date of the mobile will be extended by 60 days. Once this expiry date is reached the mobile will go into a suspended state and will only be able to receive calls and not make calls, regardless of whether there is a credit left on the account.

To make calls again, the account needs to be re-charged (a 'top-up' added) to extend the expiry date. The Mobile Subscriber has 30 days in which to do this.

If the mobile is not re-charged in this 30 day period the account becomes inactive. There is no relation to where and when a top card is purchased, it is account dependant.

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Dave Rouse: bringing the oil response plan up to date

DEPARTING the Islands on Tuesday, after a week's stay, which he described as, "simply brilliant" was oil spill response specialist, Dave Rouse.

Dave, from Southampton, works for a global conglomerate, jointly owned by the oil industry, which was formed by the recent merging of two companies: Oil Spill Response Ltd and East Asia Response Limited, the first of which was responsible for the setting up of the Falklands Oil Spill Response Plan, ten years ago.

Invited to the Falkland Islands by the Government. Oil Spill Response, as it will be known from December, is not only involved with cleaning up after oil spills, but also assists oil companies and governments in preparing for spills, advising them what equipment they should have ready and training them in how to use it.

Unwilling to comment on the specifics of the *Ocean 8* leak, Mr Rouse resisted the suggestion that his presence in the Islands had anything to do with, 'stable doors closing after the horse had bolted.' He admitted, however, that the raised consciousness of everyone involved, after such an incident made it, "the best time to strike" when it

came to planning a strategy to deal with any such incidents in future.

As well as reviewing the current plan and bringing it up to date. Dave said that he would be giving some advice to FIG on how their readiness to face any future incidents could be increased.

He described the present state of readiness as, "pretty good." Within the resources and constraints and the practicality of the location, the Falklands were, "not far away" from having an acceptable plan in place, though there was always more that could be done.

Although, he had hardly had an

opportunity to leave Stanley, Dave Rouse said that he thought our natural environment was, "quite magical" and contributing to its protection would be very rewarding. This was not, for him, a matter of just ticking boxes, but he hoped that he could make, "a bit of a difference."

While he could not comment on his recommendations before they had been put to government. Dave said there might be a need for education as to what could be expected from a plan using the kind of resources available to the Islands.

One of the important things was to minimise the environmental impact of oil spills close to a sensitive shore line; it might be impossible to prevent the oil, once it had started spreading, in which case an improved capability to rehabilitate affected wild life could be essential in the Falklands. This was an aspect that Oil Spill Response was very interested in.



Amphipods: it's the little things that can make you go... 'awww'



WHEN I first thought about doing a column on ocean animals, I thought, "how hard can it be?" After all, I have a friend who writes a bird column for a paper, and know for a fact he's never once turned down a beer at the pub because he had a deadline.

However, when I got down to it, I realised the challenge is not in coming up with something to write about, it's deciding, with 122,000 described marine species, what not to write about.

The easy choices would be to pick something charismatic like a playful dolphin or something edible like sushi-grade tuna, but, I'm going to take a chance here, because what I saw last week is just too cool not to share. It wasn't cuddly or furry or even bigger than my thumb. But it made me go "awww" nevertheless.

I was happily diving in about 15 meters of water, my fingers starting to go a little numb from the chill, when I saw an orange-red shrimp-looking thing. I took a closer look (meaning I looked like that scene in Finding Nemo when the mask comes creeping up over the ridge), and to my surprise this animal didn't skitter away to hide. In fact, I was able to put a collection bag right next to it, and with no prodding at all, it climbed right

Half an hour later, firmly on the surface and tucked safely in a bucket, this fearless non-scurrying behaviour continued. Being a slightly nerdy marine biologist, I watched for a bit, and suddenly very small swimming things began appearing alongside my new find.

If I were a poet, this is where I could wax lyrical about the miracle of life and the promise of the next

generation, but I'm not, so I'll call it what it was: amphipod brood release. Maybe you're not going 'awwww" like I was, but I'm telling you, it was cute.

As scientists, we're pretty good at making up Latin names, but we're not very good at doing it creatively. Amphipod quite literally means, "on both sides feet." in this case referring to the presence of both walking and swimming legs. Numerous species exist, and while some have the dubious distinctions of parasitising whale skin or being affectionately known as sand fleas, I have to admit I held a certain fondness for this new mother swimming in the bucket in front of me.

A little digging into my trusty marine biology notes brought out the word Peracarida, which is the superorder that amphipods are part of. Again, not very creative Latin; peracarida means, "pouch shrimp." What this loving mother had done was laid her hundred or so eggs in a little pouch underneath her body. As with all amphipods, the eggs had hatched up to a month earlier, but like kangaroos, the young had stayed in mum's pouch getting bigger and staying protected until they were more developed. I just happened to catch this proud mama right as her brood was ready to swim off.

I watched for a while and eagerly showed off my find to my shipmates, the more sentimental of whom elicited the appropriate cooing sounds. Then, we gently dunked the bucket back over the side and watched mama amphipod and her young scurry back into the protection of the kelp -

Awww.



The ships made a smooth passage from the Falkland Islands but reported that on entering the Antarctic Convergence Zone they immediately began to encounter large icebergs and Iron Duke's Lynx helicopter was used to conduct twilight patrols to ensure a safe passage.

Upon arrival, patrols were conducted to the east of the island taking in the abandoned Whaling Stations at Leith, Husvik and Stromness. Both ships entered Cumberland Bay, and Iron Duke took the opportunity to make a close approach to the Nordenskold glacier which is reported to have provided the team with some excellent navigation training.

Iron Duke has since spent some time at anchor off Grytviken which allowed the ship's company to go ashore and see the abundant wildlife in and around the whaling station

and British Antarctic Survey Staff made use of the helicopter to survey areas of the island.

Black Rover is now returning to the Falkland Islands, while Iron Duke continues patrolling activities.

Cdr Mark Newland, Iron Duke's Captain, said patrolling the island of South Georgia had been wonderful and described it as, "a truly a magical place."

His ship's company had worked incredibly hard over the last seven months, said Cdr Newland.

"To expect a young sailor to have one job in our disaster relief organisation operations, a second role when conducting counter drugs patrols and at the same time retain core skills such as those that provide reassurance to the Falkland Islands, is a big task and they have responded magnificently.

"To have been able to bring them to South Georgia is a wonderful reward for all their efforts.'



Missing cocaine: Not guilty pleads Spanish fisherman

ROGELIO Curras Pastoriza, one of the two Spanish fishermen currently detained in Stanley police station, charged with importing cocaine into the Islands, appeared in court again on Wednesday to plead not guilty to this charge and to two separate charges of intent to pervert the course of justice and burglary, which had been laid against him in court earlier in the week.

On Monday, Prosecuting Counsel, Elliott Taylforth had informed the court that the disappearance of 23 of the 29 bags of cocaine kept in a double-locked police cell had been discovered by the police on the preceding Tuesday, when there had been a need to take weapons from the armoury for training.

Mr Taylforth explained that during the renovations and extension of the police station, as a temporary measure, the armoury had been moved to the cell where the seized cocaine was subsequently stored

During the night, the court was told, prisoners were allowed a de-

gree of liberty, permitting access to the toilet and to a kitchen. The accused, it was alleged, had taken advantage of this "freedom to roam" and had discovered the presence of the cocaine in a nearby cell.

It was further alleged that by placing his hand through the "substantial gap" at the bottom of the cell door, Mr Curras Pastoriza had been able to draw the hags of cocaine towards him and remove them one by one, over a period of three or four days.

This version of the events leading to the disappearance of 23 kilos of cocaine was the conclusion of the investigations carried out by the Royal Falkland Islands Police and the military Provost Marshall, said Mr Taylforth, who added that there was now no one else under investigation.

In court on Wednesday, defence counsel for Mr Curras Pastoriza, Richard Marlor, argued that there was a possibility that the charge of burglary was already covered by the charge of perverting justice by the removal of evidence and told the court that he wished to receive

advice from counsel in the UK, as to this possible duplicity, before advising his client on how to plead.

After consultation with the prosecution counsel and some deliberation, Senior Magistrate, John Trevaskis said that it was the wish of the court that pleas should be taken.

Mr Trevaskis was concerned that the adjournment to Wednesday's date had been granted in the expectation that pleas would be entered and advised that were the accused to enter pleas of not guilty, which subsequently he might wish to change, in the light of advice received on the possible duplicity argument, this could be done without prejudice or the loss of credit for an early guilty plea.

After a brief consultation, with his defence counsel, Mr Curras Pastoriza pleaded not guilty to all of the three charges currently standing against him, namely importation of a banned substance without a licence, perverting the course of justice by destroying evidence and burglary. Skype users low priority?

CABLE and Wireless customers have not been able to use the online communications system Skype efficiently over the last week and many claim that action has been taken by the company to at worst, block it, or at least, to give it a very low priority.

Customer Services Manager Alison Thorogood said however, that Cable and Wireless are in the process of implementing an upgraded system to facilitate more efficient internet usage on the Islands: "For the customer this means that our valuable bandwidth capacity can be allocated intelligently, which at peak times is vital."

Mrs Thorogood said that it has been established that more than 75% of the bandwidth is being used for surfing, yet customer experience is being eroded by other lower demand, higher bandwidth usage types such as Voice over Internet Protocol (VOIP) and Peer-to-Peer (P2P). "Under this new system we are able to intelligently allocate priority by different usage types. This does not mean that services are being removed, as allocation of bandwidth for all types of usage remains. However, it will mean that accessibility for some services will be more readily available during off peak times," she added.

The company claims that the need to implement these policies is even more paramount as more Camp users are migrated to the new system and the need to balance customer experience in both Camp, Mount Pleasant Complex and Stanley. Continued on page 2

Chief of Police's conduct under investigation

A DISCIPLINARY investigation into the conduct of Paul Elliott, the Chief Police Officer, has been initiated by the Government's Chief Executive, Tim Thorogood, this week, in connection with the recent incident involving the missing cocaine from the Police Station.

Mr Thorogood said the investigation is an internal Falkland Islands Government process and will be led by Alison Thompson, a former Senior Magistrate on the Islands, who will be arriving at the end of the week.

The purpose of the investigation is to ascertain the facts and to establish whether or not there are grounds for any formal disciplinary charges, said Mr Thorogood.

"There are no grounds for suspending Mr Elliott who remains at work and in full command of the Police," he concluded.

Norwegian Sun marks the arrival of Falklands summer



FIRST of the large cruise ships to visit the Falklands this season and scheduled also to be the last, was Norwegian Cruise Line's (NCL) *Norwegian Sun*, which was in Port William on Tuesday.

At 78309 gross tons and 848 feet long, *Norwegtan Sun* is the largest of the NCL ships to have visited the Falklands and her captain assured that he will never be bringing her in through the Narrows, as one of his predecessors did with the much shorter *Norwegian Crown*.

Largs Bay to arrive soon



A NEW Royal Fleet Auxillary (RFA) vessel is soon to enter Falklands waters.

The Largs Bay, which was built by Swan Hunter at Wallsend on the River Tyne and entered service in late 2006 is due to arrive in the Falklands later this month.

She is one of four Bay Class Landing Ship Dock which are the replacement ships for the Sir Galahad Class LSL (Landing Ship Logistic) which served with distinction during the 1982 war.

At almost 177m long the Bay Class are larger and more capable than their predecessors. They displace some 16,100 tonnes and are designed to operate over the horizon, using helicopters and landing craft. The flight deck can accommodate two Merlin or Chinook helicopters and a floodable stern dock allows landing craft to get men and equipment

Largs Bay can carry up to 500 troops if necessary, as well as large numbers of vehicles. Specially designed to deliver vehicles, troops and equipment ashore, the vessel has storage decks approaching the size of a football pitch and is able to position itself dynamically using a bow thruster and steerable azimuth thrusters to discharge equipment without the need to anchor.

During her deployment to the Falkland Islands, RFA Largs Bay will have a Lynx Mk3 helicopter on

Lt Cdr Mike Burke, Royal Navy Operations Officer at HQ BFSAI explained that ships of this class are highly capable of delivering Armed Forces into war fighting operations, but they are also ideally suited to low intensity operations; such as providing a platform for peace support operations, as in Sierra Leone, or in humanitarian and disaster relief missions, such as the Tsunami relief effort.

"The huge capability these ships provide has already being demonstrated by operating in close support off the West Coast of Africa. Largs Bay will provide a major troop and equipment lift capability to British Forces South Atlantic Is-

Mrs Thorogood said the system will also enable greater differentiation between customer packages: "For example at present we differentiate through the allocation of line speed. In future we will also differentiate through the allocation of bandwidth by package." project will be phased in between mid-December and the end of January 2009.

She said it is important for customers to know Cable and Wireless are also working towards the procurement of additional bandwidth which will compliment these upgrades; that the overall aim is to ensure that bandwidth is being used efficiently at all times and customers are prioritised according to the package they have purchased.

Aaron Richardson, the company's Chief Executive said this is a very exciting time for Cable and Wireless and the Falkland Island community: "We are simultaneously welcoming our Camp customers to the new upgraded system, working to increase our bandwidth on island, and also using our limited Space Segment capacity in a much more efficient and pragmatic way. I would like to ask our cus-

tomers to bear with us over the next few months as this not inconsiderable undertaking gradually rolls out nation-wide.

"We would like to communicate with Broadband customers that there will continue to be periods of upgrades, such as last weekend for instance, outages and potential queues at busy periods, as we continue to integrate the new system with the old, without having to take the whole system off-line in one go. Cable and Wireless will endeavour to communicate these occurrences in a timely way wherever practicable."

Councillor Mike Rendell onfirmed that as additional camp settlements are connected to the broadband network, the existing bandwidth is being shared out more thinly, and inevitably this will affect individual users wanting to use Skype, particularly during peak use periods.

"Cable and Wireless have confirmed that more bandwidth has been applied for, so until this extra bandwidth is available it seems likely that there may be some problems for those trying to use Skype," he added.

Plan meshing issues raised within FIDB

THE presentation to the Board of the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) of a paper entitled, FIDC Business Plan 2008-2013, this Monday, gave rise to questions about both its timing and how it would mesh with other plans and reviews currently being undertaken by government.

While it was decided that the detail of the plan should be the subject of a further meeting to enable members to absorb its contents. Councillor Mike Summers queried whether it should be introduced before the completion and publication of the government's Economic Development Strategy, which is currently in the pipeline.

Chief Executive, Tim Thorogood, said that he agreed in principle and proposed that the FIDC Business Plan should be regarded as interim until the publication of the Economic Development Strategy, which was not expected to be completed before June 2009. In the meantime, the FIDC staff needed objectives and there was also a requirement for some kind of basis for budget proposals.

FIDC Board member Mike Forrest said that this was an example of the kind of confusion he felt was being caused by the huge numbers of papers, strategies and Green Papers currently going around. It would be useful, he said, if some direction could be given as to how they might all fit in with each other.

The Chief Executive said that he hoped to be able to provide a "flow diagram" which would clarify the situation.

Bank guarantee for FIMCo gives FIDB pause for thought

WHILE the Falkland Islands Development Corporation's Board at its Monday meeting, accepted various recommendations from FIDC's Interim General Manager aimed at strengthening the Board of the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) and the support that it receives from FIDC, including the addition of two new non-farming Board members, it drew the line at authorising actions relating to the renewal of the bank guarantee in favour of FIMCo, until it had received more financial information from the company.

FIDB member, Drew Irvine, said that he was concerned that no management information was presented to FIDB, from FIMCo, a company which was a whollyowned subsidiary of FIDC.

Fines for speeders

DANIEL Ford and Darren Wade both pleaded guilty by post to charges of speeding and were fined £286 and £268 respectively in court on Wednesday.

Doubtful Falklands claim | Delays likely in

CLIVE Shorters, (47), for 16 years a colour sergeant in the Walsall Sea Cadets and described by Midlands newspaper, the Sunday Mercury, as, a Falklands War veteran, hailed a hero after he helped save dozens of lives in a hornfic hospital blaze, has been accused of poisoning a fourteen year old boy.

The 1984 fire at the King Edward Memorial Hospital in Stanley, which left eight people dead, struck a terrible blow to a community, which was still far from recovering from the trauma suffered during the war two years previously.

An enquiry lasting two years led to Clive Shorters, a member of the same British Forces, which had so valiantly rescued us from Argentine occupation, being brought to court, accused of arson; the awfulness of the situation could hardly have been

The case eventually came to court in the Old Bailey in London in 1991, with witnesses summoned from as far away as the Falklands and Tasmania. To the surprise and anger of many, Mr Shorters was acquitted, largely on the grounds that the evidence against him was circumstantial.

Withheld from the jury, because in the opinion of the judge it could prejudice the accused's chances of a fair verdict, was the information that Mr Shorters had been convicted of starting fires in a hospital in Aston

(UK) in 1989 and had been seen in the vicinity of several fires in his barracks during his army career.

According to reports in the Penguin News of the day, during the time of his appearance in the Old Bailey, Mr Shorters was being de-tained "without limit of time" in a psychiatric hospital, by order of the Stafford Crown Court.

While we maybe have to accept the court's ruling in the matter of the KEMH hospital fire, and as a consequence, his bravery in attempting to reduce the number of fatalities which resulted from it, what does appear to be in doubt is the claim made in the Sunday Mercury that Mr Shorters was not only a Falklands 1982 veteran, but "among the first British soldiers to be sent there, serving as a paramedic with 5 Armed Field Ambulance.

Penguin News consulted military historian and genuinely heroic Falklands veteran, Hugh McManners, who reported that although 5 Armoured Field Ambulance did go to war in the Gulf between December 20, 1990 and April 8, 1991, in 1982 it was based in Munster.

Mr McManners concluded his re-ply as follows: "Military history isn't a Walter Mitty-esque characteristic obviously. So if this creep served in 5 Armoured Brigade Field Ambulance, he would have been in Germany throughout the 1982

Broadband extends to West Falkland

Residents of Port Howard and Fox Bay are the lastest Cable and Wireless customers to be connected to the new rural communications network.

The new network offers broadband connectivity for the first time, in addition to providing a higher quality telephone service.

The new service to Port Howard and Fox Bay has been made possible following construction of new telecommunication sites at Sussex Mountain, Glorious Hill, Coast Ridge, Leicester Hill and Port Howard along with upgrades to a number of existing sites.

A total of 12 new main transmission sites are being constructed as part of the upgrade programme to support a protected, high capacity transmission network and to provide WiMax coverage, said Paul Shelswell, Project Manager for the Camp Upgrade.

The majority of the site build work has been completed during the winter months by Cable and Wireless engineers with a number of new tower builds on West Falkland to be completed in the next two months.

Mr Shelswell commented: "We are very pleased to offer the new service to residents of West Falkland for the first time. To provide this service, the engineers had to overcome a number of technical issues linking East to West Falkland and were also delayed by strong winds in November that severely restricted climbing activities." He added, "Our engineers have also been working hard to resolve a number of issues on the existing network which has taken priority over the new network build, but we can now focus on continuing with the network build."

Customers in North Arm and Mount Alice are the next to be upgraded to the new network along with a number of WiMax subscribers on East Falkland.

Three part aim of immigration proposals

The Falklands Immigration policy has been described in recent years as a 'trickle' policy with no specific skill areas being targeted and no need for the population to be increased by an agreed percentage per annum, as other countries

The proposals for an immigration points system, as agreed by Executive Council, set out, on a gradual and controlled basis, to encourage permanent immigration when it is in the interests of the

Falklands, taking into account three key areas.

These are given as: to increase the human capital of knowledge, ability and skill in the Islands, to develop and increase enterprise and innovation and to safeguard social cohesion and promote integration.

The proposals in full are laid out in a consultation document, available from the Secretariat, with comments to be sent to the Principal Immigration Officer, Pete King before December 19.

cocaine case

THE need to send evidence to the UK for analysis may cause considerable delay to the eventual trial of the two Spaniards, currently held in Stanley on charges relating to the illegal importation of 30 kilos of cocaine.

Crown Counsel, Mr Elliott Taylforth, said on Wednesday that the degree of purity of the cocaine seized might well affect sentencing, particularly in the case of Jesus Carballo Martinez, who had already pleaded guilty to the importation charge.

While giving assurances that everything was in place in the Falklands for the shipment to the UK of the six kilos of cocaine still remaining from the original quantity seized, Mr Taylforth said that the relevant authorities to whom it was being sent for analysis were experiencing difficulty in obtaining the necessary licence for its importa-

Further delays could be expected once the cocaine had arrived in Britain and he could not foresee a trial taking place before the end of February, or the beginning of March. Senior Magistrate, John Trevaskis, is hoping to be able to set a trial date next week.

No further delay for McRae trial

A REQUESTED adjournment of the trial of Charlotte McRae, set for next Tuesday, was refused in court on Wednesday by Senior Magistrate, John Trevaskis.

Miss McRae's defence counsel. Richard Marlor, had requested that the set date be vacated and a new date set for January, on the grounds that pressure of work and an impending holiday prevented adequate preparation.

Objecting to the proposed delay, Crown Counsel, Mr Elliott Taylforth, said that a delay would help neither the aggrieved, described as, "an elderly man of nervous disposition," nor the defendent, who was currently suspended from her job until the issue was resolved.

'Moment of madness' lands pensioner in court

HAVING had her case adjourned for a week, to enable her to seek legal advice, Mrs Yvonne Jones pleaded guilty in court on Wednesday to having taken groceries valued at £51.33 from the West Store, without paying for

Accepting claims made on her behalf by her defence counsel, Mr Matthew Thomson, that the theft was "a moment of madness" for which she was very sorry and taking into account her previous good character and an early guilty plea, Senior Magistrate, Mr John Trevaskis, gave Mrs Jones a conditional discharge for twelve months. Prosecution costs of £70 were also awarded against her.

Tourist invasion heralds summer in Stanley

IN many countries summer may be heralded by the appearance in the streets of pavement cafes and girls passing by in skimpy summer dresses, but in the Falklands it's different; here summer fills our streets with signs pretending that our national dish is fish and chips and Ross Road can be filled to the centre with slow-moving hordes of people, who may be both strangely attired and over-dressed.

Although the tourist season started some weeks ago, it was only last Tuesday, with the arrival of Norwegian Sun, the first of this season's large cruise ships, that it finally began to feel like summer in Stanley.

At the invitation of the Captain, Penguin News joined a small group, including Councillor Richard Cockwell. Consumption of Alcohol. The Consumption of Alcohol by any passengers travelling on the Air-Bridge or waiting for a flight at Mount Pleasant Airport is forbidden. Any breach of this policy may result in passengers being refused travel or being off-loaded from the aircraft. The only exception to this is passengers who have purchased Premium Economy seats who will be provided with a limited amount of wine with their meals.

Duty Free Purchases. Duty free wine and spirits are available for purchase from the NAAFI kiosk located in the Departure Lounge. A Crown Counsel Elhott Taylforth replied to questions 1 - 6

Road traffic law applies to all roads and public areas within Stanley and to roads and public areas within four miles of the boundary of Stanley.

Road traffic law also applies to any other road which the Governor has declared to be a road for these purposes. The following roads have been declared to be roads to which road traffic law applies: the road from Stanley to Darwin (including the Mount Pleasant Road), the Port Louis road, the Fitzroy road, the roads within Mount Pleasant Complex. the roads within the Naval port at Mare Harbour, and the Mare Harbour Road.

Therefore, in answer to questions I and 2, any road which is not within Stanley or within four miles of boundary of Stanley and is not listed above, whether on East or West Falkland, is not subject to any road traffic law except the law requiring the wearing of seatbelts (which applies widely

throughout the Falkland Islands).

As a result, in answer to questions 3 and 5, there is no requirement for a driver to hold third party insurance to travel on a road which is not subject to the road traffic law, and there is no offence of drink driving on such roads.

In answer to question 4, a road may be designated by the Governor for the purpose of imposing a speed limit on it. There are no speed limits on roads which have not been designated for this purpose

If a person suffers injury because the vehicle in which the person was travelling is hit by another vehicle whose driver had consumed alcohol and was driving negligently, the injured person could seek compensation through the

Councillor Janet Robertson provided the following response to

the final question.

There is concern that with the advent of the cross-sound ferry greater tourist activity on our roads increases the risk of accidents where uninsured drivers are involved. The RTO Group put forward a recommendation to Exco in November to proceed with designation of all roads in the Islands to come into effect with the new Bill in February. It would include third-party insurance requirements for road users all around the Islands. Whilst accepting the need to move towards full designation of roads. Exco acknowledged that some further work is required on the details, specifically in relation to definition of roads, required signage, the effects on insurance requirements for agricultural vehicles and practical solutions to them. The AG's Chambers have been tasked with developing the policy further and we would expect to receive a further recommendation in due course. The Bill will make provision for full designation to come into effect once the new policy has been accepted by Executive Council.

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Marlene clocks up a quarter century of dental care

A WELL known face in the Dental Department, Marlene Newman has today clocked up 25 years in the post of assistant to the dentist.

It's not only 25 years that have passed: Marlene has worked with 25 dentists to date in makeshift surgeries, in both Stanley and the Camp and is now one of three fully qualified Dental Nurses in the state of the art department at the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital in Stanley.

On December 5, 1983, Marlene who had just moved to Stanley from Green Patch with her four children, started work as part time assistant to Robert Watson, the resident dentist at that time.

A large, ruddy cheeked man who, armed with the tools of the trade struck fear in the hearts of the school children, who were annually checked over by him, Robert is thought by some to have formed the basis of the service we now enjoy, while others claim the mouthful of fillings they carry are a result of his over enthusiastic efforts to beat decay.

Mariene said she found him to be a more than adequate dentist, "He didn't tolerate any wimps."

With one surgery, one dentist, and a laboratory shared with the military, Marlene took up her new post alongside Robert, who not only cared for the Stanley popula-

tion but would each winter pack up a mobile dental unit and travel around the Camp settlements. Still vivid in Marlene's mind is

Still vivid in Marlene's mind is an incident that happened soon after she started work. A patient was being prepared for the removal of a wisdom tooth, which is never a pleasant experience and she, armed with her suction tube was ready to assist. However with no uniform supplied, the fashion conscious assistant was wearing a bright orange top with ties around the neck.

A lapse in concentration found her in the predicament of trying to remove the ties on her top from the suction tube, rather than the fluids from the patients mouth.

"It made me pick my clothes a bit more carefully," she said.

In 1984 a fire burned a large part of the hospital down and with Robert in Camp, Marlene set to getting the surgery cleaned and ready to work on his return. It took a week to scrub out, she recalled, but it was soon business as usual.

Robert left the Islands in 1985 and was replaced by Andrew Watt.

With the hospital rebuild on the cards, the dental surgery was packed up and set up in a small room in the Police Station, where the battle against decay was resumed until the new hospital was opened in 1987.

Moving into the new surgery, complete with waiting room and a new laboratory, was like starting a new job, said Marlene. "Up until then we had a small dry sterilisation unit for surgical instruments and everything else was washed in the sink and dried on a tea towel," she recalled. "It makes me cringe to think of it now, but there was not the awareness of AIDS and cross infection that we have now."

As the years and dentists, both resident and locum, drifted by, the facilities were further improved. In 1996, with the budget enhanced by the fisheries income, an additional surgery was completed and a locum dentist added to the staff.

In 1994 Marlene travelled to the Havant Health Centre in Portsmouth, UK, for work experience and also to Southampton where she spent time in an Aids clinic.

Later, in 2000 she undertook further training and completed her exams in the Charles Clifford Dental Hospital in Sheffield to become a fully qualified dental nurse.

Not a job for the faint hearted, Marlene said she enjoys all aspects of the work, particularly surgery and theatre.

The days of visiting Camp settlements are also among her favourite memories and there is no doubt she has worked in some unusual surgeries. A mobile home at Port Howard, a caravan at Goose Green not to mention setting up shop with the ex-military mobile units

in a front porch or scullery of someone's house. "I just loved getting out to Camp and meeting people," she said.

Dentistry has had its ups and downs over recent years, but now it is back on an even keel and the standard is, "first class," said Marlene.

"The education side of dental health is getting through and the service offered is of an excellent standard with patients being seen within a week."

Meanwhile, early retirement is a possibility for Marlene who has no plans beyond that. "I'm sure I'll soon find something to do," she said.

The Volunteer Band from HMS Collingwood will play in the Cathedral. A collection for the Lighthouse Seaman's Mission will be made during the service.

At the conclusion of the memorial service at about 10.15 am the parade led by the Volunteer Band from HMS Collingwood will march to the Battle Memorial.

At 10.45 am the parade will arrive at the Battle Memorial. Detachments of the Royal Navy, the Falkland Islands Defence Force and Members of the various youth organisations will be present. At 10.58 His Excellency the Governor will arrive at the Battle Memorial and will inspect the Parade. After prayers, he, Councillor Richard Stevens, the Commander British Forces will lay wreaths, as will others. There will be a flypast at 11.12 am.

After the ceremony at the Battle Memorial there will be a march past. His Excellency the Governor will take the Salute from a dais at the entrance gates to Government House lawns.

Members of the public wishing to attend the ceremony are asked to arrive no later than 10.50 am.

Not laughing policemen

OH dear. Oh dear, oh dear, oh dear. How much more can the Falklands police take? I feel sorry for the force, but it is impossible not to join in the laughter at their loss of a million quid's worth of cocaine.

The government appears to have placed a news blackout on the matter, but *Penguin News* bravely refused to run a five-line story. They told readers all that they had been able to ferret out and a bit more. Good work.

So far as I can tell, only the Sunday Mirror has picked up the story in the UK. They ran a short piece headlined "CIm of cocaine stolen – from a cop shop".

"It's Cocaine Galore," said a friend. He was recalling Compton McKenzie's wonderful novel about a Scottish island community that took illegal possession of a wrecked ship's cargo of whisky. Between guffaws my friend fantasised about islanders hiding bags of coke in baby's prams and in toilet cisterns.

But let's be clear: none of us are laughing at the nasty business of the global drugs trade, just at the absurdity of its impact on the Falklands. I often compare the Falklands with the Archers, but BBC scriptwriters would never come up with a plot as nutty as this

But, as I said, I still regard the Stanley police with affection. Briefly, back in the 1970s, I walked the Stanley beat in the uniform of a police constable. Toddy McMullen and Walter Felton had just retired, Terry Peck was still the chief, and he commanded a very tiny force.

Each day at about 7am we rounded up the cows that had navigated the pasalibre (cattle grid) from the Common and were happily chewing lupins and honeysuckle in Stanley gardens. Most of the time, not much else happened, which gave Terry and the force time to undertake their unofficial social work. We would visit the homes of a few highly disadvantaged families to check that they had the essentials of life, like peat and food, and were doing their best to stop drink totally destroy their lives.

We would keep an eye on the pubs at closing time and probably help a few old timers home. Occasionally, someone might be taken back to the station to sober up. It was good community policing, and I recall no one saying otherwise.

Since then, the force seems to have forgotten how to be ordinary coppers. They lost the affection of the community and that is probably why its cocaine conjuring trick has been treated as terrific entertainment.



'Tis the season of, erm, penguins

There has been a determined assault on the territory of reindeer, sleigh bells and old men in red coats. For a few years the highly territorial robins held out, but force of numbers overcame them too. I regret to inform that this year Penguins have taken over Christmas.

Yesterday, I went shopping for baubles. There were penguins everywhere: on cards, on wrapping paper, configured as bells and even, disturbingly, as five foot high sculptures.

Why? They have no natural claim to Christmas. Santa comes from the North Pole and penguins are too dann lazy to swim north of the equator. Furthermore, although I have studied very little scripture since attending Paul Charman's Tabernacle Sunday School classes. I'm pretty sure there were no penguins among the animals that gathered around the manger. Mary did ride into Bethlehem on what might be called a jackass, but I believe it had four legs. Were the Three Kings actually king penguins? I think not.

I never thought I would say this of my favourite bird, but here goes: "Get back to your heathen rookeries. You don't work for Santa, you had nothing to do with the little baby Jesus and we want our robins back."

Injustices

Gurkhas, some of whom served in the Falklands War, continue to fight for the right to live in the UK. The lovely Joanna Lumley (I interviewed her once, and can say that she really is lovely) has championed their cause. Her father fought alongside Ghurkhas in Burma during the Second World War, and she has not forgotten that.

Existing law affects only older Nepalese veterans, but among them are some of our most decorated soldiers. At one stage during the hearings, a judge remarked, "It seems strange that Falkland Islanders were granted British citizenship, and yet the Ghurkhas who fought for them were not." Hard to argue with that.

The Chagossians Islanders have also been fighting for their rights. In the early 1970s the British Government deported the 2,000 or so people who lived in the Indian Ocean colony to the Seychelles and Mauritius, where many have since lived in poverty. However, they never gave up their demand to return to their homes, even as the Americans developed strategic bases on the islands.

The legal process has been a roller coaster ride for the Chagos people. In 2002 the British Parliament granted them the right to return to their islands. But in 2004, the government enacted draconian immigration controls that effectively barred islanders from returning

In 2006, the High Court ruled that the 2004 immigration controls were unlawful. But the government appealed to the House of Lords, which last month decreed that the government was in the right; islanders cannot return.

This seems so blatantly unfair that it is hard to see how the injustice can be maintained, especially by a government that likes to occupy the moral high ground.

Chagossians are thought to be preparing a case for the European Court of Human Rights. But why should they have to? The British Government supports 2,000 Falkland Islanders' who claim the right of self-determination, but apparently does not believe the same principle should apply to the 2,000 Chagos Islanders. "They ae good people to work with. Thanks for making me feel at home, although 1 blame you guys for my weight increase!" said Jo.




Everyone's a winner at the Swimming Gala



Recalling that the Falklands Fire Brigade had the previous day undertaken their annual fire engine pull, the challenge was soon out for a tractor pull and a quick whip around resulted in £110 being generously donated to the fund. Makeshift harnesses were fashioned and the Ford tractor with Patch Adams, the farm's almost resident 'gopher' behind the wheel, was towed over an undulating gravel road for a distance of 800 yard. No horse power, just man and of course, woman power.



GARDEN PLANT SURVEY



The South Atlantic Invasive Species (SAIS) project is working to find out which plants are growing in gardens in the Falkland Islands. Wild and agricultural plants have been studied for many years, but, up to now, no botanist has studied the garden plants of the Islands. This survey will, for the first time, allow a complete list to be drawn up of all vascular plants growing in the Falkland Islands. This checklist will be an invaluable resource for future botanical research and wildlife conservation.

Who's that peering over the garden fence?

My name's Richard Lewis, I'm a botanist based at the UK Overseas Territories dept. of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, and a keen gardener. I'm currently employed by the SAIS project and will be visiting the Falkland Islands for 3 months fieldwork, from early December 2008 to early March 2009. Most of the survey will be conducted in Stanley, but I also hope to visit a few settlements in camp.

I will be contacting a number of households to invite you to participate in the survey. All that is involved is a visit for an hour or two, during which I will record a list of all plants growing in your garden. I may also wish to take photographs or samples, though I will only do this with your permission.

I will also be making occasional records, if I see something particularly interesting as I pass by any public or private gardens. I will always attempt to contact you before I make any records from your garden.





Please don't weed!

Garden weeds are just as important to my survey as ornamental or useful plants, so if you know I'm coming, please resist the urge to weed. If you can't bear to leave the garden completely unweeded, then please leave at least a few plants of each weed species.


Panto season starts next week




Ā big thank you to the Falkland Islands Government Office in London, with-

Missing drugs: Spanish fisherman pleads guilty to charge of burglary

THE dropping of one of two charges laid against Spanish fisherman Rogelio Curras Pastoriza, led to a change of plea in court on Thursday.

The charges of attempting to pervert the course of justice and burglary were brought against Mr. Curras Pastoriza last week in relation to 23 kilos of cocaine which were discovered to be missing from the Police Station on November 25.

Mr Curras Pastoriza had pleaded not guilty to an earlier charge of importing 30 kilos of cocaine into the Islands on board the fishing vessel Venturer, while his colleague Jesus Carbullo Martinez has pleaded guilty

Defence counsel, Richard Marlor said that it was a fundamental legal principle that no one should be punished twice for the same conduct. Advice received from counsel in the UK suggested

that in bringing both charges against his client, this might happen. It could not be foreseen, said Mr Marlor, that his client might be found guilty of one charge and not the other.

Although stating that he did not necessarily agree with Mr Marlor's assertion, Crown Prosecutor, Elliott Taylforth, consented on practical grounds, to offer no evidence in the perversion of justice charge, though he said that this would be cited as an aggravating feature of the remaining burglary charge.

The accused, being informed of this and charged again with burglary, this time pleaded guilty.

Due to expected delays in receiving forensic reports from the UK, the Senior Magistrate, John Trevaskis scheduled Wednesday February 4 for a pre-trial review.

Comment by Acting Deputy Editor, John Fowler

MY lack of enthusiasm for the councillors' monthly public meetings is well known in this office, so it was, I suppose, with some trepidation that the Editor asked me to attend this week's meeting and with some-

thing less than grace that I agreed.

To make my feelings clear, I'm not against giving the public the opportunity to question councillors, far from it. It's the format that I don't care for, which seems designed to stifle the free exchange of views and information, rather than encourage it. I know it is rather more difficult to set out chairs in a circle than in straight lines, but it is no accident that the one arrangement is associated with, 'caring and sharing' situations, while the other more with court rooms, tribunals and other situations, where people are confronted by authority with a capital A.

(If you don't think that seating arrangements matter, ask yourself why dictators have always taken such a keen interest in how their offices are arranged; interior design for its own sake was not something shared by such people as Hitler and Mussolini, but an interest in intimidating

others was).

Even were the seating arrangements less confrontational, speaking in public would not be easy for many people, which is not to say that their thoughts and opinions should be discounted. The increasing length and complexity of some of the important papers that are currently in the public domain means that they require more than a moment's study and may raise quite complicated issues, which may not be best suited to, 'off the cuff' oral comment and questioning.

Worst of all, maybe, I have the sneaking feeling that councillors may view the public meeting as an exercise which establishes their democratic credentials, but which is in reality more of a necessary evil than a wel-

come medium for genuine two-way communication.

Given the fact that the Falklands has one of the highest rates of internet access in the world and with improvement in its quality spreading out to Camp, is this not the time to abandon the sparsely attended public meeting and initiate the kind of on-line discussion forum that we were promised so many months ago would be part of the new Councillors' web site?

Obviously people currently have the option of submitting written views to councillors, but an on-line discussion site would have the advantage of allowing those views to be publicly aired for comment immediately, allowing for considered responses from councillors and contributions from nearly all the rest of our community, instead of from just the vocal and self-confident few that presently attend public meetings.

Small turnout for PRP points scheme debate

WHILE five hundred and thirty eight Falkland Islands electors registered their views on a points-based immigration policy in the recent Media Trust poll, with four hundred and twenty-seven in favour, it would appear from the turn-out at this week's public meeting that public interest in this topic has since waned.

By Penguin News's calculations, if one excluded from the count the three members of the media and others, who had to be present, like Government Secretary, Pete King and his PA, Lynn Brownlee, the councillors present almost outnumbered the audience.

Surprisingly enough, this small band appeared to contain no representatives of those immigrant communities in the Falklands, who were excluded from the Media trust survey by virtue of not being on the role of electors.

The purpose of the meeting was to allow the general public the opportunity to discuss with councillors a paper of proposals for an immigrant points system, for applications for Permanent Residence Permits (PRP), put together by the Working Group on Immigration, which has wrestled with this subject for two years, since imposing a moratorium on applications.

Government Secretary and Principal Immigration Officer, Pete King, began the meeting with a short presentation, encapsulating the paper's principal recommendations, before inviting comments from the floor.

Mr King stressed that the proposals were not targeted only at the highly-skilled, like some schemes existing in other countries, but were aimed at producing a well-balanced population, by means of a selection process which was transparent, flexible enough to be responsive to any future changes in requirements and offered would-be applicants the opportunity for self-assessment.

Responding to a question from Karen Lee as to whether the granting of PRP would be automatic, once the criteria outlined in the paper had been met and a sufficient score gained to pass the threshold, Councillor Janet Robertson, the Chair of the Working Party on Immigration (WPI), said that in such a case there should be no reason for refusal, but that the final decision would be made by the Principal Immigration Officer.

Councillor Mike Summers said that his preference was that the scheme should be advisory, rather than mandatory and that the Attorney General, whose advice had been sought on this issue, tended to the view that a mandatory scheme would perhaps create difficulties.

Falkland Islands Company Director, Roger Spink, asked whether there were any exceptions, which would allow the points system to be over-ridden and John Fowler suggested that the self-assessment threshold would prevent people for whom exception might be made even applying for PRP and that this might result in the loss of potentially useful members of society.

An early topic raised was whether the school system could cope with further population expansion. Responding, Councillor Mike Summers said that while there were no firm plans to expand the schools, the granting of PRP to candidates with children would make no immediate difference to the demand for school places, as they would already have been in the country for some years.

The ensuing discussion encompassed such topics as health, family size, paper qualifications, as opposed to relevant work experience, the need to attract all-rounders and what priority should be awarded to those would-be immigrants with close relatives already living in the Islands.

Most contibutors to discussions were concerned about the need for balance, both between the conflicting requirements for tranparency and discretion in the immigration process and between the country's need for specific skills and discouraging those who might be anti-social or a burden on the tax payer.

Even among the councillors present there appeared to be some divergence of opinion as to how these balances might be achieved and the relative weighting that should be given to the categories included in the points system.

Cllr Summers maintained that immigration issues formed a huge part of the work currently being carried out on the Economic Development Strategy. It was, he said, difficult to see how additional economic growth could be achieved without additional popu-

lation growth.

By the end of the meeting, while there was possibly a greater appreciation of the many difficulties involved in creating a system which was fair and would completely meet the various present and future requirements of the Falkland Islands for new settlers, there did also seem to be a degree of consensus that it was important to end the current moratorium on PRP applications and get a system in place as soon as possible.

Airman's remains to return to the Falklands?

ARGENTINA and the United Kingdom are involved in negotiations for a humanitarian flight to the Falkland Islands to carry the remains of an Argentine pilot for burial at the cemetery in Darwin, according to reports on Monday in the Buenos Aires press.

The remains, which were repatriated to Argentina after being located in the Royal Falkland Islands Police Station earlier this year, were confirmed by DNA testing as those of an Argentine Air Force First Lieutenant, Jorge Casco.

Following the identification of the remains, Casco's relatives and the Malvinas Committee of Next of Kin began the formalities to have his remains buried at the Argentine cemetery at Darwin in the Falklands, according to reports.

There was press speculation that this will be a first sensitive task for the newly arrived British Ambassador Shan Morgan.

Mercopress reported that Argentine diplomats took note of Ms Morgan's open letter to the Argentine public, where she stressed that, "the UK shares Argentina's deep commitment to the protection of human rights."

Transporting the remains is considered a special case since they belong to an airman, entitled to military ceremony. One option would be for an RAF aircraft to transport the remains, under the instruction of the International Red Cross, reported *Mercopress*.

The remains were originally found on the Jason Islands in 1999 and kept at the Stanley Police Station. They were returned to Argentina under special custody, on the July 19, 2008, Mount Pleasant to Punta Arenas LAN flight.

Councillor Mike Summers said that to date there had been no official request to bury the bones with other of the Argentine airman's remains already in the Darwin cometery.

"Councillors will respond if and when there is an official request," he added.

Yachtsmen narrowly escape injury in coastal minefield

A HORRIFIED Falklands vessel owner radioed for assistance for crew members of a Belgium flagged yacht who inadvertently wandered into a minefield on Saturday evening.

South Atlantic Marine Services Managing Director Dave Eynon said he was sailing around Kidney Cove when he saw movement on the beach. As he got closer he observed people on the beach and a tender at the other end — three people were in a known minefield.

He said the individuals on the beach were clearly off the yacht *Via*, anchored nearby. Two other vessels, one owned by the Falkland Islands Government Chief Executive Tim Thorogood and the other by Dr Richard Davies, were also in the area.

"Richard Davies was sailing up and down and appeared to be attempting to get their attention. He couldn't get close enough to the yacht though, so I managed to move close enough to warn the one crew member on board the Via of the danger his colleagues were in," said Mr Eynon, who then radioed Cable and Wireless and told them of the situation.

After much waving and hand signals the three people in the minefield returned to the their tender: "It was very lucky it was low water and they were only on the beach; they could have been in much more trouble if they had gone further inland and encountered the antipersonel mines there," said Mr Eynon.

A British forces search and rescue helicopter from 78 Squadron at Mount Pleasant was scrambled to assist in removing the three crew members, but by the time they were at the Via's location they were back on board.

One would assume that visiting yachts would be made aware of the danger of minefields in the Islands, with the first point of contact being Customs and Immigration. This department however, consulted over a three day period, was unable to confirm whether or not maps and relevant literature was distributed by them to visiting yachts, but advised that they would be able to provide an answer next week, when they would be less busy.

In the Falklands it is an offence to enter a minefield, however the Chief of Police, Superintendent Paul Elliott said that enquiries had revealed that the incident was a mistake, rather than wilful trespass and did not justify further police action.

He said it was his understanding that the master of the Via was given the standard 'Ports and Harbours Information' document by Customs, which included a section about mines and unexploded ordinance dangers, but did not specifically include a minefield map.

The detection of landmines in the Falklands is extremely difficult because many were laid remotely. About 80 percent of landmines are hidden beneath sandy beaches and peat that can shift the mines position and make detection and removal more difficult. In all, 4,220 mines have been removed from the islands. MP/PN

Northumberland's redeployment no cause for alarm

THE Commander British Forces, Air Commodore Gordon Moulds, was quick to respond this week to suggestions in the British press that the Falklands would be left undefended by the decision to divert the frigate HMS Northumberland to a European Union counter-piracy mission off the coast of East Africa.

"HMG is fully committed to the defence of the South Atlantic Overseas Territories, which include the Falkland Islands. The frigate is one constituent part of a comprehensive package of air, land and maritime assets that together maintain our deterrence posture on the Islands.

"The deterrence force can also be reinforced quickly should the need arise.

"As with any UK defence capability, HMG needs to ensure that the capacity exists to deal with any operational requirements that may arise. I am confident that the assigned force package is sufficient to meet the task."

HMS Northumberland, which is armed with guided missiles, torpedoes and a Lynx helicopter, was due to begin patrolling duties in the South Atlantic this month. Its place has been taken by the Royal Fleet Auxiliary ship Largs Bay, described in last week's Penguin News.

Brand new survey vessel to head South



DUE to arrive in Falklands waters in mid-January is the brand new Fugro Saltire a survey, construction support and intervention vessel, built earlier this year, which is to carry out seabed surveys for BHP Billiton.

Moored in Falmouth in the UK at present, visitors to the docks have said they are impressed with the vessel. Andrew Bell, formerly of Cumow Shipping Ltd and a friend of Rob Pitaluga, said the ship is the largest off shore supply vessel he has ever seen.

It is thought that the Fugro Saltire is being fitted with a drilling rig before heading South.

Changes afoot for FIG? - Chief Executive's review leaked

A DRAFT report for consultation entitled Review of Government major outcomes, compiled by the Chief Executive Tim Thorogood was leaked to the public last week.

A lengthy and as yet incomplete document that summarises progress on the comprehensive Review of Government being led by Mr Thorogood, it outlines the approach taken in conducting the review, reports findings from discussions with stakeholders and reviews of best practice overseas and analyses the key issues to provide a comprehensive set of proposals. "These will achieve a more strategic, dynamic and efficient public sector best suited to achieve the aspirations of the Islands Plan within a challenging global context," said the Chief Ex-

The review contains 23 recommendations together with a Change Programme as the next step to a new organisational structure for government and seeks approval at the next Executive Council meet-

The report which has been independently reviewed by three people, one of whom is former Chief Executive Dr Michael Blanch, recognises that while the Government has many strengths, the lack of a comprehensive review has produced a number of practical weaknesses. These include a lack of capacity to plan ahead and coordinate effectively to deal with complex developments proactively. There is also a strong feeling across stakeholders. including staff, that the organisation has become rather static.

Discussion with focus groups have been collated with themes, remedies and action plans analysed and laid out in a table. One of the key actions to be taken further is that there is a need for a small team of strategic directors, six to eight being the recommended number throughout the report, to cover the whole of government.

The vision inspiring the recommendations of the report is of a Govemment and small island state which by 2012:

 Provides strong aspirational leadership, supported by an organisation which can think and plan ahead in an imaginative, but well informed way.

· Engages and focuses the efforts of the community and of its own staff behind common endeavour, shared goals and a game plan.

 Achieves world comparable standards of performance and efficiency, able to deliver strong projects and good services, in a much more challenging financial climate.

 Provides unity of outcome but diversity of delivery, thus stimulating initiative, creativity, competition, enterprise and stronger economic growth.

· Maintains and continuously improves its foundation of strong Governance, resourcefulness, financial standing and community orientation.

That there is a considerable body of local opinion that the "extensive and monolithic" public sector should be substantially reduced both on value for money and economic growth grounds is recognised as a Government target, but it is noted that there is justifiable concern that private sector monopolisation would result.

The time and effort needed to progress a reduced public sector given the considerable challenges of scale, remoteness and lack of experience in the Islands should not be underestimated, said Mr Thorogood, adding that there is evidence to suggest that if this can be done, then the benefits for the government and the economy may be considerable.

The Development Corporation is currently undergoing a review of its future role and structure to fit with the Government Review. It is the Chief Executive's view that the FIDC review should include recommendations to review the direct input of government and define a more strategic relationship and operational independence for the Corporation and that similar reviews should now be commissioned for each statutory corporation, board or publicly owned company

The wish to reduce management costs has also been mentioned, particularly by business and this can be achieved potentially in three ways, said Mr Thorogood:

In the short term by a reduction in posts and in the development of the remaining staff to adopt wider generic roles; and in the medium term by investing in new ways of doing business (including privatisation, technology and stronger financial, project and performance management).

"Levels of delegation have been found to be uncertain and often

Councillors and senior managers get involved in operational details. A new management structure will require clear role definitions in which the top decision makers focus on strategic issues and operational management is devolved. This will need to be supported by significant on-going development, particularly at middle management level to develop skills and embed changes to behaviour."

To meet these needs a recommendation to Executive Council is that a new organisational structure should be created which has a small top team ideally of between six and eight Corporate Directors which relates logically to the Islands Plan and political structure.

A further recommendation from the report is that regulation should be strengthened with, "substantial powers to regulate across a wide but defined field including private sector monopolies and mergers, civil aviation, telecommunications and all services transferred from government to the private sector. Stronger regulation could in the future be devolved to an Executive Agency.

There are many other aspects of government covered in the report and the likelihood of an impact on service performance during change is recognised as being high. The negative effects on staff and the community as a result of change to job or worse, loss of employment is recommended to be counteracted with high levels of communication at all stages, reassurance with regard to employment and income security and allow any reduction in posts to occur naturally over time.

Consultation with staff is expected to begin in December after Executive council meet, with specific organisational structure proposals to go to the January ExCo

Leisure ideas to open local branch

LEISURE Ideas, the procurement and freight forwarding agency established in 2003 by Roy and Beverley McGill, is to be re-branded "South Atlantic Trading" and will open a local branch in January 2009.

The Falklands branch, which will occupy the premises formerly known as ZAKS at 53 Fitzroy Road, will initially be open on weekday afternoons. Roy explained that, whilst the outlet will have a variety of interesting and innovative products available for sale over the counter, it will pri-marily be a "showcase" where customers can browse through catalogues and look at samples in a relaxed environment before placing their orders.

The outlet will incorporate an internet cafe allowing customers to make selections from the internet and place their orders in "real time". For the technophobes amongst us help will be on hand. "The continued aim of the business is to bring the UK High Street to the customer's fingertips, whilst

removing the hassle," he added. Orders will continue to be delivered as they are at present, either by regular containerised shipments and local delivery service or, for smaller items, in dedicated Priority Air Mail bags, which are dispatched daily and usually arrive within a week.

Roy said that while he and Beverley will continue to live in the UK for the foreseeable future it would be, "very much a local business", employing at least one local person, and paying Falkland Islands tax.

With the world in financial turmoil, taking such a step seems like a brave move, but Roy and Beverley say that they have listened to what their customers want, and are now very much looking forward to being a fully integrated part of the local economy.

Roy will be visiting the Falklands from January 5-23 to get the outlet up and running and looks forward to meeting as many customers as possible.

Court news

Prosecution throws in the towel

HAVING first appeared in court on October 22, to face charges of theft and attempted theft, relating to offences allegedly committed in July, Stanley Care Assistant, Charlotte McRae walked free on Wednesday, having been found not guilty on all counts, by Senior Magistrate, John Trevaskis.

On Tuesday, the court had watched a video interview between Sergeant David Roberts of the Royal Falkland Islands Police and the complainant, Mr Roy Davis, who was later cross-examined by Ms McRae's defence lawyer, Mr Richard Marlor.

On the second day of the trial, prosecuting counsel, Elliott Taylforth, told the court that certain changes from his original statements given to the police by the complainant, Mr Davis, in his evidence and subsequent questioning, meant that Ms McRae no longer had a case to answer with regard to a first charge of theft from Mr Davis's wallet.

In view of this and the fact that certain other unexpected admissions by Mr Davis had undermined the two further charges of theft and attempted theft, faced by Ms McRae, Mr Taylforth said that he had come to the conclusion that he was not in a position to prove any of the three charges against Miss McRae and asked the court to dismiss them.

In winding up proceedings, the Senior Magistrate stated that as the trial had already begun, the appropriate disposal would be to find Ms McRae not guilty on all three charges. He ordered the payment of defendant's costs in her favour.

The Senior Magistrate endorsed Mr Taylforth's statement that the decision to abandon the case implied no criticism of Mr Davis's honesty, decsribing him as, "a truthful, though troubled witness."

Airport delay a crushing blow for the St Helena population

FURTHER delays for an airport on Saint Helena has delivered a crushing blow to the population's hopes of having an airlink in the not too distant future.

Andrew Gurr, Governor of St Helena, has expressed the deep dismay of the people of St Helena at Monday's announcement by the British Government that negotiations over the contract for constructing an airport on the Island

are to be delayed.

Describing the statement as, "a severe set-back to the future development of St Helena and the Islanders' hopes of reducing their dependency on the UK," Mr Gurr said: The construction of the airport is vital to stimulate economic development and reverse the decline in population. At present there is only limited access to St Helena by sea. An airport would bring about an unprecedented stimulus to the island and its inhabitants. The potential for tourism is significant and the


project would benefit the British

public, who are currently supporting St Helena through their taxes and the people of St Helena in their quest for greater self-sufficiency. I very much hope an affirmative decision will not be long delayed."

In a separate statement, the Island's Legislative Councillors stressed the disappointment felt by their constituents:

The councillors said that the project has been seven years in the making during which the plight of St Helena has worsened. "The UK has a legal responsibility to ensure the political, economic and social development of Overseas Territories such as St Helena and to promote constructive measures of development.

The longer a decision on the airport is delayed the more costly it will be for UK taxpayers and the people of St Helena alike. Doing nothing is not an option. We earnestly hope for a positive decision soon," the statement concluded.

Passengers escape unscathed after cruise ship goes aground in Antarctica

PANAMANIAN flagged. Argentine owned cruise ship. Cuidad de Ushuaia, with 89 passengers and 33 crew aboard, ran aground during the night of December 4, in Wilhelmina Bay, on the Antarctic Peninsula.

Early reports from Australian press sources, suggested that while the vessel had developed two cracks as a result of the impact, it was in no danger of sinking, despite leaking fuel and taking on water.

The passengers were evacuated to a Chilean naval transport, while the cruise ship's crew were reported to have remained on board their vessel to carry out salvage actions, as directed.

A Chilean helicopter was also dispatched to fly over the area of the accident to survey a fuel slick left by the ship, and other reports were that the resulting oil slick was being contained by floating barriers

This is the third accident involving Antarctic cruise ships in three years. In December 2007, the Norwegian cruise liner, Fram, with 256 passengers and 70 crew on board, floated adrift in the same region for two hours, before rescue, after its engines failed.

In November 2007, pioneer adventure cruising vessel, Explorer, sank after hitting an iceberg. Its 154 occupants took to the lifeboats and were rescued without injury.

On Tuesday the Cuidad de Ushuaia was reported to be making headway under its own power and the oil slick was under control. (AP/PN and others)

The convoluted response from Cable and Wireless was like swimming through mud to get to the heart of the message and I write as an English teacher, daily attempting to teach students to make their intentions clear in written work!

So, let me get this straight, because I am not sure that I yet have.

Those people, like myself who have bought into a broadband package are being and will in the future be, treated differently, depending on the size of the package we have purchased?

According to Mrs Thorogood. if I have understood her correctly. there is already differentiation between customer packages, in terms of the 'allocation of line speed' and in the near future, there will be further differentiation, in terms of the 'allocation of bandwidth.

Where was such discriminatory practice mentioned in Cable and Wireless' promotional literature to sell these packages, and, if PN had not forced a response, when was Cable and Wireless going to inform broadband users of these practices?

It was my understanding, when I bought a broadband package, that customers bought different packages on an estimation of their personal internet needs, not that differently-priced packages would be differentiated in terms of line speed and band width.

To bring in such restraints after the customer has signed up is, at least, being economical with marketing truth and, at worst, might be seen as Cable and Wireless deliberately misleading customers.

So, Cable and Wireless, what was your underlying message? Was it that all customers must buy the most expensive package if they want better access? If so, please say so in clear English.

Cable and Wireless Customer Services Manager Alison Thorogood responded:

PACKAGES are provided with a number of differentials as described in our literature; inclusive MBs, number of e-mail addresses, cost of overage charges and speed.

Differential download speed is specified by the package that our customers contract. This means that traffic on Island is faster for a gold customer than it is for a silver customer, which is in turn faster than for a bronze user.

To reinforce a clearer speed differential by package at the point of contention (where requests hit the satellite), we also now allocate our bandwidth according to package. Users may continue to specify the service level that they require by selecting the appropriate package for their needs, as outlined in our literature. This is not a change in

The fact is that HM ships did not refuel from the Camber, although the Camber was an Admiralty Coal Depot they bunkered from colliers in Port William. These included battle cruisers Invincible and Inflexible together with cruisers Carnaryon, Kent and Cornwall. Light cruisers Bristol and Glasgow bunkered from the hulk of the SS Great Britain in Stanley harbour, while armed merchant cruiser Macedonia remained on patrol outside.

HMS Canopus was moored and beached in the vicinity of Whalebone Bay not in the Canache and fired her salvos from there.

The German squadron was first sighted at 07.30hrs on December 8. 1914 by Christian Andreason, a lookout on Sapper Hill, not Hookers Point.

Finally Tim's granny, Mrs Felton, did indeed telephone the report to Stanley from her house at Fitzroy at 11.32hrs after two girls, Christine Goss and Marion McLeod who worked for her, reported seeing three vessels later identified as the German colliers and supply vessels Baden, Santa Isabel and Seydlitz.

While I applaud the work Tim does with these youngsters, there is no use teaching history if the facts given are incorrect... that's how history gets rewritten.







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Falkland Conservation's oiled penguins fly to freedom

WINGING their way to Volunteer Point must have been a strange experience for a group of rescued penguins and they were undoubtedly one of the most unusual cargos the crew of the Sea King Search and Rescue helicopter from Mount Pleasant's 1564 Flight had carried.

Sergeant Jonna Carrington is used to dealing with a broad range of challenging scenarios; however, as he helped carry his latest passengers to the Sea King on Thursday, he said the penguins were definitely one of their more unusual cargos. "As professional aviators we normally try and avoid any contact with birds," he added.

The Falklands Conservation team over the last few months have done a fantastic job rehabilitating a number of oiled penguins that were found around the Surf Bay area in Stanley. Amongst them were four Kings that the organisation were keen to release at Volunteer Point so that they could be monitored and studied - currently there is very little release data on rehabilitated oiled penguins in the Falklands.

Falkland Conservation's Sarah Crofts contacted the helicopter operations because minimising stress was considered pivotal to the success of the operation and a possible five hour overland journey to Volunteer Point represented a significant risk. Once at Volunteer Point all four penguins

were understandably keen to be released from their containers and after a short walk along the shore of the lagoon, they headed into the water as a close knit group.

Sarah said all the penguins arrived in very good condition following their short flight from Stanley.

"It was great to see that they were keen to get into the water and enjoy their new found freedom. The RAF's assistance has given the birds the best possible chance of survival."

Sarah said the operation demonstrated much of what is best about the Falklands: "Key organisations like the Department of Agriculture, Falklands Conservation and the military all successfully collaborating to help support this very special environment. The whole community has really pulled together for this project and in particular I would like to thank the Veterinary Department, all our volunteers and everyone who took the time to come up and take a look at the penguins while they were recovering at Stanley – the support we've received has been fantastic.

"Importantly we've all learnt a huge amount from this experience in terms of how we go about rehabilitating animals in the future and the resources required; today's release should very much mark a beginning and not the end," she concluded.

FOUR small islands in the Sea Lion Island Easterly group that have never been inhabited or grazed have been explored and surveyed by Trustees from the Antarctic Research Trust (ART).

The research trust is a Falklands registered charity whose main purpose is to conduct and support scientific research on Antarctic and sub-Antarctic animals in order to provide baseline data for adequate conservation measures.

In 2004 the Trust purchased four small islands in the Sea Lion Islands group, namely Rum, Whisky, Brandy and Sea Lion Easterly. This group of tussac islands lies about 20 miles off mainland East Falklands, close to Sea Lion Island, and was recently designated an Important Bird Area.

White Sea Lion Island has developed from a sheep farm into a popular tourist site, the smaller islands have never been inhabited or grazed by livestock; nor have any alien mammal species such as rats and mice been introduced.

ART trustee Sally Poncet said that as such, they provide one of the few remaining havens for the flora and fauna originally native to the Falklands and that the Trust intends to maintain the islands in this state by protecting them from future exploitation and the introduction of alien species.

Last month, Sally with fellow trustees Klemens Putz and Benno Lüthi set out to visit the group for the first time.

Karen Neely and Vladimir Laptikhovsky of the Shallow Marine Survey Group also joined the team for a couple of days of diving. Visiting yacht Billy Budd and her crew, Clive, Laila and Steve provided invaluable assistance in getting the team out to the islands from Stanley for the first couple of days of survey and to meet up with the main survey vessel, local yacht Le Sourire from Dunbar Farm. Hugues Delignieres and Marie-Paul Guillaumot with their two children Marielou and Theo had taken time off from farm work to take part in the survey: "It is thanks to them and to the owner and crew of Billy Budd that everything went so smoothly. The weather couldn't have been better either, and we were able to land on all four islands at least once, and undertake dives at Brandy and Sea Lion Island," said

In total, 18 species of flowering plants were found in the group. Rum and Whisky were completely covered in dense tussac grass, while Brandy and Sea Lion Easterly also had extensive areas of bluegrass meadow wetlands, a now rare wildlife habitat in the Falklands. A total of 31 bird species were also recorded, including sooty shearwaters, grey-backed storm-petrels, common diving-petrels and very large

numbers of tussacbirds and the endemic Cobb's wren.

Sealions, elephant seals and a fur seal were also recorded, and one of the most interesting finds of the survey was an elephant seal satellite tag. This small electronic device had been attached to a South Georgia seal by researchers from the Sea Mammal Research Unit. In its travels, the seal is presumed to have hauled out on the beach at Sea Lion Easterly where the tag had fallen off while the animal was moulting.

Sally explained that the tag has a telephone number on it and Klemens is looking forward to finding out more about the seal's travels - and about the reward offered for its return!

The ART trustees would like to express their sincere thanks to everyone involved in the success of this survey, and in particular Mariacristina Rapisardi, owner of the yacht *Billy Budd*, and Jenny Luxton on Sea Lion Island.

Planning and building update

By Graham France CHAIRED by Councillor John Birmingham, this was again, a relatively short meeting with just seven applications seeking detailed planning permission.

These were presented to members of the committee by Environmental Planning Officer Antony Payne, whose recommendations to grant conditional planning permission to each were accepted, and the following were approved: a porch on her dwelling at 5 Murray Heights for Ellen Davis; double garage to be erected at 3 Beaver Road for David Ford; an extension to her house at 6B Ross Road West for Shona Strange; dwelling at Mullet Creek Farm (East Falkland) for Martyn and Andrea Barlow; house at 2 Narrows View for Michael McRae (Jnr) which followed earlier outline consent; the change of use from a private dwelling to tourist accommodation for Ben Berntsen at Elephant Beach Farm on East Falkland; and an extension to his garage at 34 Eliza Crescent for Gordon Peck

During discussions on these. one member raised the issue of lack of clarity on the plans in proposals to erect an extension when the new work was not distinguished from the existing structure by suitable colouring. The committee agreed that such a lack could and did in fact lead to an element of confusion for lay members and urged that future proposals did include colouring of new work.

In contrast to the limited number of applications for planning permission, there were no less than twenty-five submissions seeking building permits and Building Adviser Nick Stephens duly reported his findings on each.

He had been able to issue four such permits, one proposal was "exempt", two were awaiting his plan check and the rest, bar one, he awaited information from the applicant or their agent. That sole application he reported upon following a site visit to Carcass Island and was for a utility building for Rob McGill. In accordance with the requirements of the Building Regulations for proposals such as this on "distant sites" he asked that his written report be accepted and approval be given, and this the committee were pleased to agree

Antony Payne then updated members on two outstanding planning appeals, one of which (an outline application for two houses at Mink Park on Moody Brook Road which was refused by the committee last June) had been decided at a recent meeting of Executive Council (ExCo) where the decision was to reject the appeal. The other appeal was in respect of the committee's decision last October to refuse outline planning permission for twelve houses at the Moody Brook Homestead, and here he was preparing the draft statement which would be presented to the next meeting of the committee for approval before it was forwarded to ExCo.

Members were advised that Les Harris is due to complete his three-year period on the committee next February and that there would be an advertisement appearing in early January inviting applications for the lay-member po-

The open part of the meeting concluded with January 8, agreed as a provisional date for the next meeting.

The mean maximum temperature for November was 14.0 Above the long term average of 12.8. The highest temperature recorded was 22.4 C on the 22nd and the lowest maximum was 7.4 C on the 5th. The mean minimum temperature was 4.6 C, above the average of 4.0 C. The lowest minimum was -0.7 C on the 6th and the highest minimum of 11.0 C was recorded on the

Rainfall wa above average with a total of 45.3 mm against the normal for November of 38.5 mm. The wettest day was the 26th with 14.0 mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 18 days and 1.0 mm or more on 12 days.

There was 266.0 hours of sunshine, above the average of 214.1 hours. The highest daily total was 15.3 hours on the 21st. There were no days when no sunshine was recorded.

There were eight days when snow or sleet fell and seven days when hail was reported. There was one day when snow was reported lying. There were no days of thunder or fog.

The monthly mean wind speed was 18.9 knots, well above the average for November of 16.1 knots. The highest hourly mean speed of 41 knots occurred on the 26th and 28th The highest gust of 61 knots occurred on the

There were 24 days with gusts over 33 knots, above average for the month. 12 days with gales were recorded, well above average of 4.5 for November.

Brittle stars: buying out the fishnet stocking market

PEOPLE often ask me if there's anything I miss about my pre-Falklands life in Key West, Florida.

I suspect they expect an answer referencing the weather or the warm water, but the answer that always runs through my head, whether I voice it or not, is quite simply: drag queens. I can't help it. There's something about standing behind a high-heeled, lipsticked man buying a loaf of bread that improves any trip to the gro-



cery store. As I ponder my fascination with men willingly stuffing their feet into pointy-toed shoes, I conclude that perhaps it's not that unusual in the grand scheme of things. After all, remaining a male or a female for one's entire life is actually somewhat uncommon among species.

Certainly bacteria, amoebas, and most plants are not easily definable as male or female. But even within the animal kingdom, you'd be remiss to buy either blue or pink romper suits for earthworms or snails. Before looking too far down our noses at these "primitive" species, I'll note that even many fish behaviours would make my grandmother blush.

What is surprising is that, with this male-female confusion occurring throughout the animal kingdom, a sizeable group of animals called echinoderms, which includes the likes of sea stars and sea cucumbers, leads a relatively straightforward one-male, one-female life cycle.

Yet some research into a common Falklands animal suggests an exception to this rule. Not yet possessing a common name but probably open to suggestions, the brittle star Ophiacantha vivipara is an unprepossessing brown colour, but sports bead-like points on its arms that would be the envy of any drag queen's evening gown. What's interesting is that despite being questioned for nearly a century, the sexual orientation of this multi-armed beauty remains unclear.

Three different hypotheses have attempted to explain the male/female distribution of this species:

1. In 1907, a brittle star specialist (there are such people) declared that the females of this species have 6-8 arms while the males have only 5.

2. Twenty years later, another specialist agreed that 6-8 armed individuals are all females, but that the 5 armed variety begins life as males but matures into females. However, he also noted that the 5-armed variety is only found south of the Falklands, begging the question of how our local population reproduces with no males around.

3. A few years later, the same specialist changed his tune to state that regardless of arm number, all individuals change sex not once, not twice, but three times in their lives. If true, this would be extraordinarily unusual and evolutionarily awkward. I suspect it would also be awfully confusing for the brittle star in question. At this point however, interest in multiple sex changes seems to have waned, meaning that to this day, there is still no answer as to what sort of "alternative lifestyle" these animals are living.

Maybe I'll start counting the arms on the brittle stars I see. Maybe I'll

Maybe I'll start counting the arms on the brittle stars I see. Maybe I'll look through our specimen collection to determine which organs are in our own samples. But I'll most certainly never look at Ophiacantha vivipara the same way again. They remind me that whether lurking under a kelp blade or sashaying through a grocery store, my day is improved by long-legged gender-switching animals.



From messboy to master

PROUD grandmother Joyce Allan, received news this week of the success of Islands-born Paul Clarke, who has just received his Master's Certificate.

Looking for a change of scenery, Paul has worked since then as Chief Officer for various companies, on oil rig support ships, mostly around South East Asia.

In November this year Paul returned to South Tyneside Nautical College to take his Master's oral exam, where he achieved his ambition and earned his Masters Foreign-Going certificate!

Paul and his wife, Dr Christy Williams, live in Newcastle-upon-Tyne, where Christy works as a Clinical Psychologist.

Endurance under tow to Punta Arenas

HMS Endurance is currently being towed by a Chilean tug and is expected to arrive in Punta Arenas today, according to Mercopress, quoting the latest reports from the Chilean Navy.

On Tuesday the Royal Naval ice patrol vessel was some 330 kilometres west of Punta Arenas, in the western access to the Straits of Magellan and heading for Valparaiso, when she suffered flooding of the engine room and subsequent main power failure.

The cruise liner, Norwegian Sun, which has already made two visits to Stanley this season, was reported as standing by to evacuate the one hundred or so people on board Endurance, should it have been necessary. Another small vessel, Pudii was also on hand in the area.

Several civilian passengers, in-

cluding a film crew and a group of students, were evacuated as a precaution, some by Puma helicopter and others on the Chilean Navy's fast missile boat *Casma*.

In spite of running out of main power, Endurance was able to anchor safely at the western access of the Magellan Strait, to wait for the arrival of the tug, Beagle to begin towing her.

Chilean authorities also had a naval aircraft patrol in the area and a helicopter was on stand by for any emergencies.

In Punta Arenas it is expected that HMS Endurance will be joining the Panama flagged cruise vessel Ushuaia, which ran aground in Antarctica almost two weeks ago and is expected to be dry docked in the Asmar naval works sometime next week.

Falklands own sniffer dog

THE Falklands could soon have its own drugs detection dog if a paper to go before Executive Council is approved.

The recent drugs find has highlighted the fact that the Fałkland Islands and its waters are being used as a shipping route to import drugs from South America into Europe, Chief Police Officer Paul Elliott told the Police Committe on Friday.

The incident reignites the issue of whether or not the Falklands should have its own drugs dog, said Superintendent Elliott, adding that there is little doubt that a full time drug detection dog would be a valuable asset to both the Police and HM Customs and Excise.

In the past, one of the barriers to there being a full time dog handler in the Falklands was the training costs. However the Falklands police now has an officer with considerable experience of handling police dogs. PC Paul McDade has undergone training while he was an RAF Police Officer and has served more than 11 years on dog handling duties.

Superintendent Elliott said that he had sourced a 40 day course in Kent, in the UK for £5,400 that included the purchase of a dog. Flights were not included in the

cost, he added.

While the funding was not available from this years training budget, Mr Elliott said that there was the possibility that the cost could be split with the Customs department.

The Police Committee agreed that the proposal would be helpful in the fight against drugs and the Chief Police Officer, working with Customs, is to prepare a paper for Executive Council requesting the funding be included in next year's budget process.

'Satisfactory' progress report for FICS

IN its assessments of the various elements of a school's performance, Ofsted the UK Government's Office for Standards in Education, Children's Services and Skills, awards four grades: outstanding, good, satisfactory and inadequate.

When the Falkland Islands Community School was inspected in October 2007, its performance in some key respects was found to be inadequate.

A two day inspection of the school, described as an 'interim review'and using the Ofsted cri-

teria was carried out this November by Mike Chislett, an inspector/adviser of the Service Children's Education Service and brings some good news.

Director of Education, Barbara Booth, said the progress review of the Falkland Islands Community School has concluded that overall the school has made "satisfactory progress and that their capacity to improve further is judged as good."

Considering the progress the school had made against specific recommendations made in the

2007 report, successful progress was noted in the areas of safe-guarding pupils, teaching and learning and leadership and management.

Good progress with considerable improvement was also noted in the behaviour of students, with incidences of bullying much reduced and no longer raised as an issue by students.

The report however, describes the area of academic achievement as one of unsatisfactory progress, which it hopes will improve.

MY heart sinks at the idea of reducing, or even worse, removing funding for higher education students overseas, as suggested in the Green Paper entitled Options for Funding Further and Higher Education, presently out for consultation.

As the introduction to the paper says, the Falklands have much to be proud of. "It is a small, independently minded and self sufficient community, an advanced democracy, whose citizens enjoy a relatively high quality of life." It makes me feel proud to be a part of it, albeit in a very small way, but it also makes me feel sad to see that independence and self sufficiency being eroded by an urge to be like and to adopt the ways of other countries and states".

Whenever changes are suggested, be it a reduction in expenditure or plans for development, comparisons are made with other countries, understandably most often the UK, but also Australia, New Zealand and more recently the Channel Islands. The education funding paper is no exception

and the systems used in other countries are referred to.

While I appreciate that the research is necessary, as an Islander it rankles that we should strive to be like or imitate others in any way. These Islands historically relied on sheep farming, but we don't have to act like the woolly headed creatures themselves and follow the leader with such intensity that we end up plummeting off a cliff.

Unique used to be a word that was often used to describe many aspects of the Falklands. whether our way of life, our wildlife, our hospitality, our medical service or our education provision. "Unique and second to none"

we would gleefully boast to newcomers and visitors alike.

When we've finished cutting and eroding services and changed our lifestyle beyond recognition, what are we going to claim that makes the Falklands stand out in the crowd: our road network? the outstanding success of the abattoir? our secure new jail? or the most trees per person consumed by a treeless country to produce green papers and reviews? OK, I know I'm being a little facetious, but it's food for thought.

Where education is concerned, be it further or higher, let's find something that works for the Falklands. Don't let's bring other countries in to decide what our kids need. Find something that works for them, for our unique situation and hopefully doesn't leave them starting out in life with a

huge debt hanging over their head.

Development such as the New Haven ferry terminal was planned for future as well as present needs and we now have a magnificent, it somewhat costly, infrastructure to serve the entire community. The political will was there, so the funding was found.

Providing higher education to our students is an equally vital investment in the future of the Falklands, the benefits of which will still be being reaped, when the ferry terminal has crumbled into the sea and the abattoir bears a ghostly resemblance to Ajax Bay. The will just has to be found.

Green Papers out for discussion

Higher and further education funding and wealth related payments

THE suggestion of cuts to maintenance grants to overseas students received a mixed reaction from those attending the public meeting on Tuesday evening.

Some said that the education

Some said that the education system should be left well alone while others thought it might be reasonable for either parents or students to make a contribution to further and higher education.

Director of Education Barbara Booth gave a brief presentation on the budget related Green Paper on options for the funding of higher and further education, currently out for consultation, while the Chief Executive and Financial Services Manager presented the paper on wealth related payments (means testing).

Former Councillor Dr Richard Davies said that while he was not against means testing as such, education was a separate and special issue that needed careful considera-

If parents were expected to pay for their child's further education and their willingness to contribute varied, it would mean that not only would some children suffer, but the state would too, if bright children had been denied an appropriate education, said Dr Davies.

The Director of Education explained that the maintenance grant to further education students of £50 per week was in essence "pocket money" and asked whether parents should make a contribution to that element. Mrs Booth said the indication from both partner colleges (Peter Symonds and Chichester) was that Falklands students, "tend to have a tad too much," disposable income in comparison with fellow students.

Several people objected to this concept saying that it was not comparing like with like, that resident students have advantages that are not available to overseas students. Having to leave college for exeat weekends and find alternate accommodation was one example cited, by a parent.

In addition to the further education maintenance grant, college students receive two return flights per year (£1550), full board and accommodation equates to £8,200 and an allowance of £185 is given for internal travel. The total cost to government of further education in 2008/09 is £399,331 for 34 students.

With 32 students in higher education, the cost to the government is slightly less at £346,240.

The Green Paper offers options for reducing the costs of higher (university) education which includes student loans which are cited as being the most common method used in other countries, along with grants for means tested students.

Parent and former Education Board member, Dr Barry Elsby, said that huge savings had already been achieved within the department, with the reducution in fees from 'overseas' to 'home' student rates. A saving of £12,000 per student had already resulted in a saving of £385,000 since the change in 2007, he said.

The Chief Executive, Tim Thorogood, introducing the means testing paper said that exceptional public services are enjoyed in the Falklands, which are particularly expensive to run, but inspite of that are provided free. Benefits such as child allowance are provided universally, he said, adding that the issue now is affordability.

The Green Paper states that one of the main roles of Government is the protection of the less well off, but the provision of universal benefits and free services in some ways favour the rich. Government is minded to seek additional contributions towards services from the better off.

The paper lays out a general increase in taxation as an alternative to direct payment for services. It suggests that this has a wider scope than the 'user pays' principle, but that many would criticise a general tax increase for specific services only

Concerns were expressed that there was a danger that the administration for means testing could cost more than it was worth and that a tax increase would be a lot simpler. Councillor Mike Summers agreed that it would indeed be simpler, but said that the last tax increase had not been welcomed by the public.

Advised by the Senior Magistrate that he had come very close to a custodial sentence, Mr Poole was advised that he needed to address his underlying problems of alcohol abuse, depression and gambling addiction. A further condition of his probation was that he should report regularly to the Community Psychiatric Nursing Service.

Those who resist the constant urgings of the police that vehicle owners should remove their keys will be heartened by the Senior Magistrate's admonition to Mr Poole that taking away a vehicle which had its keys in it, was particularly reprehensible as it "struck at the heart of local custom."

Death by reckless driving: Stanley man pleads not guilty

APPEARING in court on Wednesday, Stanley man Shaun May (18) entered a plea of not guilty to the charge of causing death by reckless driving on May 20, 2008

Senior Magistrate, John Trevaskis, adjourned the case until February 11, in order to allow time for expert advice to be obtained from the UK, should it be necessary, by both Mr May's defence counsel, David Lang and the Crown Counsel, Elliott Taylforth.

Mr Lang said that he had been advised to engage the services of an expert to determine whether mechanical defect should be offered as a factor in the case. There being no one in the Falklands who would qualify as an expert in this field, he would have to seek one in the UK.

He was not yet in a position to indicate when such advice might be available, nor whether it would affect his defence of his client. "The bird is in the air," he said, "but I'm not sure that I'm going to shoot at it."

Mr Trevaskis expressed the hope that it would be possible to move towards a trial, after Mr May's next appearance in court.

Atlantic Conveyor veteran

CAPTAIN of the cruise ship Discovery, that visited Stanley last week, was John Brocklehurst, the Chief Officer on the Atlantic Conveyor making his first visit since the Falkland's War.

Many will no doubt recall that Atlantic Conveyor was lost after being hit by an Exocet missile fired from an Argentine aircraft on May 25, 1982.

A roll-on roll-off container cargo ship of some 15,000 gross tons, Atlantic Conveyor was bringing much needed military equipment, including twenty-five aircraft to assist in the recovery of the Islands. The aircraft included eight Sea Harriers, six RAF GR3 Harriers, four Chinooks and seven Wessex helicopters.

Other cargo included 3,000 tons of aircraft spares, heavy earth moving machinery and airfield construction equipment, a large quantity of tentage for accommodating troops after re-occupation of the Islands, ammunition and a vast quantity of stores of all descriptions.

Fortunately the fourteen Harrier aircraft were flown from the ship, shortly after she arrived off the Islands, together with one Chinook and one Wessex helicopter.

The loss of the remaining helicopters on board, when the ship was sunk, resulted in the majority of the troops having to march all the way from Port San Carlos to Stanley, carrying their kit with them. This, in turn, delayed the final recovery of the Islands, together with the surrender of the Argentine forces, by at least one to two weeks.

During his visit, Gerald Cheek took Captain Brocklehurst to Cape Pembroke to see the memorial to the Atlantic Conveyor, with which he was extremely impressed. He also visited the Liberation Monument and Memorial Wood.

At the Memorial Wood Captain Brocklehurst paid his respects at the trees that were planted in memory of his twelve crew members, who lost their lives when the ship was hit.

One of those who died was the Master of Atlantic Conveyor, Captain Ian North. Ironically, Captain North was serving on a merchant ship during the Second World War, which sunk after being torpedoed by a German U-boat, but sadly he did not survive the sinking of the Atlantic Conveyor.

FOGL surveys get under way

REPORTS on a number of oil and investment related web-sites this week have mentioned the beginning of Falkland Oil and Gas's (FOGL) site survey programme in its license areas to the south and east of the Falkland Islands, which is expected to be completed in early 2009.

MV Fugro Meridian, operated by Fugro Surveys, has begun to acquire digital site surveys in order to assess drilling hazards in the top few hundred metres of sediment below the seabed. Detailed seabed bathymetry and imaging surveys will be obtained to ensure the suitability and stability of drill sites.

British Antarctic Survey vessel James Clark Ross has been contracted to deploy instruments to measure waves and currents. Their findings will be used in environmental assessment and the preparation of rig mooring and riser design.

The final part of the survey is a coring programme to establish the make-up of the top 150 metres of seabed. Information from this programme will be used in the detailed casing design of the wells. Construction support vessel M/V Fugro Saltire will begin this part of the program in January 2009.

FOGL is now said to be attempting to secure a suitable drilling rig for operations in the area.

Prison work to resume

DISCUSSED at last week's Police Committee meeting was the stoppage of work previously being carried out by Morrison (Falklands) Ltd on the prison and additional offices at the Police Station, which has been the subject of Police Inspector Len McGill's Penguin News column, 'Out of my Window.'

Chief Executive, Tim Thorogood, said it seemed to him to be a. "little bizarre" that major works with a high public profile could just stop.

Superintendent Elliott said it was his understanding that the Morrison gang had been taken off the police station job to concentrate on the Sand Bay abattoir project on the advice of the Director of Public Works (DPW). This was disappointing as the progress had been impressive up until the stop date, more than three weeks ago.

Mr Thorogood said he would discuss the issue with the Director of Public Works, adding, "At first sight it looks less than satisfactory."

Conserve water as dry weather continues

THE Water Superintendent, Craig Paice, has asked that the public conserve water where possible as the dry weather continues.

There is not an immediate shortage and there is no question of a hose pipe ban, said Mr Paice, however he asked that the public use the supplies sensibly, particularly when watering gardens.

"Your garden will get the most benefit from a watering in the evening rather than during the day and it will help conserve supplies," he added

Worthwhile Age Concern meeting

THE newly-formed group, Age Concern attracted more than 30 people, including some invited councillors and health and social service staff, to a meeting at the Community School on Thursday evening, to discuss concerns for the elderly of our community.

A spokesperson for the group said that they felt that legitimate complaints raised at various times had not been heard, or had not reached the right person to be dealt with properly. The purpose of the meeting was to make the relevant authorities aware that there was more than just the occasional complaint filtering through.

Frank discussion took place and many areas of concern were highlighted, including the lack of information provided to the families of elderly people resident in the hospital and inadequacies in the complaints procedure.

The hospital equipment provided for the elderly, voluntary help and feeding regimes were also discussed.

The spokesperson said it was not the intention of the group to start a witch hunt, or to point the finger at any individual, but because it was such a small community it had been noticed that some things were not right.

"These complaints also occur in larger hospitals, but are not so personal because we don't know the staff and probably don't see or socialise with them again," added the spokesperson.

Councillor John Birmingham who was one of three councillors to attend the meeting said he thought it was very interesting and worthwhile. "I expect that something positive will come out of it," he added.

The Age Concern group wish to thank the guests for attending and hope to continue to work with the health and social services to improve the understanding and support between the two groups to improve the care of the elderly.

Sharing each others' lives for a quarter of a century

STANDARD Chartered Bank opened its doors in the Falklands on December 1, 1983, apparently not without a certain amount of concern on the part of some of the older depositors that their money might get lost between the old Savings Bank in the Secretariat and the new bank's premises, in what is now the office of the Mineral Resources Department.

Its two first cashiers were Barbara Keenleyside and Hayley Bonner, chosen, it is fair to suppose, because they had both had previous experience of handling other peoples money: Barbara with the Midland Bank in the UK and Hayley as a cashier in the Gov-

ernment Treasury.

Still with the bank, Barbara is now Deputy Manager and Hayley, Service Delivery Manager, they are therefore also celebrating twentyfive years of service to the public.

Recently Barbara and Hayley spoke with *Penguin News*, along with Gina Tyrrell, another long-term employee, so keen to join the staff in October 1984, that she turned up for her first day on the Peat Cutting Monday bank holiday, and, finding nobody there, had to walk home again.

Barbara admits that on the first day of Standard Chartereds operations she and Hayley did not really know what they were doing. "Locally we had only had savings accounts," said Hayley. "Suddenly we were introduced to savings accounts, current accounts, short call accounts, fixed deposits and cheque books,"

Cheque books, which were a new thing in the Falklands, appear to have been a particular source of grief and annoyance to the new bank staff. They had to be made laboriously by hand, and printed with the account holder's name and account number. This was a time-consuming job involving a muchhated embossing machine, which Gina still remembers gleefully tossing into a skip, when its day was finally over.

The original bank building, a standard Brewster kit house, minus some of the internal partitions, had its problems too, principally a lack of space. This became worse as more staff were recruited.

Early customers may remem-

ber the queues which spilled down the steps, regardless of the weather, so small was the public area in front of the two cashiers' windows.

According to Barbara, being outside waiting was not necessarily a bad thing, however, because at least one escaped the oppressive heat in the banking hall, which caused one tourist to faint away.

For the first few years, staff wore their own clothes, but were expected to be smart. It was not until about five years after the bank was opened, that uniforms - described by Gina as "very itchy," were introduced

These early problems were followed in 1990 by the introduction of a computer system, so wonky at first, that it sometimes needed "baby-sitting" till late into the night. Staff sometimes had to endure the sight of friends heading for a good time at dances in the Town Hall, while they were still at work.

Barbara, Hayley and Gina were concerned. "We hated it by the time we came to leave," said Gina.

Despite these vicissitudes, seven different managers and the phenomenal increase of business from around 400 vouchers a day in 1983 to some 4,000 daily now, what comes across when talking to Barbara, Hayley and Gina is their tremendous loyalty to the bank, described by Hayley as, "a second home now."

Looking through the bank's album of photographs, it is obvious that the staff of our local bank are a tightly knit bunch, who spend a lot of time together, outside working hours, much of it on charitable work.

Being part of a banking group which is mainly located in the poorer parts of the world, it is clear that the Standard Chartered Bank in Stanley have not only spent a quarter of a century sharing each otheres' lives, as Hayley put it, but

have also become very much involved in the lives of others.

Barbara, for example, knew without having to research the number of Standard Chartered Bank staff in Africa. who regularly have to take time off work to care for family members infected with AIDS.

Whether taking part in the midwinter swim for local charities, or the bank's own Stanley Marathon in support of the charity, "Seeing is Believing," Barbara, Hayley, Gina and the rest of the Standard Chartered staff are there, not because they have to be, but because they want to be.

In line with their charitable work, Barbara, Hayley and Gina urged everyone to buy a raffle ticket for the quad bike pictured below to be drawn at the bank's 25th anniversary open party at the Race Course on December 27. See page 9 for more information on the event.

POOR old Falklands! The monopolies grind relentlessly on and make Falkland Islanders ever the poorer. Who can be surprised that Cable and Wireless don't like Skype and would do anything to degrade its performance? They have always acted like King Canute in trying to hold back the tide of technical competition.

Who remembers when Cable and Wireless first began and wanted to ban the use of Two Meter sets because they took revenue away from the phone system? Fortunately the Council of the time told them to get lost.

Then when Call Back systems arrived they equipped themselves with a piece of kit that would detect such calls and degrade or block them. There was quite a row about that and in the end they admitted having such equipment but, "...we never use it". Yeah yeah.

Now there is Skype and this must have knocked a huge hole in their revenue - I wonder how long it will be before they make a really serious attempt to ban such systems instead of just degrading them. Meanwhile the cost of a broadband connection is astronomic by comparison with the rest of the world. For example - in Europe, you can get a broadband mobile connection that you can use anywhere for £15 a month which is faster than the Cable and Wireless Gold package at £120 a month and allows the same download amount - 3 GB per month.

I know there is some justification for higher costs in remote places but that is ridiculous!

As for the other parasite on our limited resources - Stanley Services - it is iniquitous that this Government and Councillors allow this overseas monopoly to continue to transfer huge profits to its shareholders and not pass on the lower oil prices to Falkland Islanders.

At time of writing oil is now below \$40 a barrel from \$140 only

a few months ago with producers in deep trouble - particularly the Russians it seems. I bet Russia wishes it had a few suckers like us to pad out their profits!

We have had one miserably parsimonious reduction in the price of diesel by 3p/litre. Anywhere else in the world people would be rioting in the streets at such a performance by their Government. Come on Falkland Islanders - don't take this lying down! Ring your councillors!Let them know what you think whenever you meet one - or the Governor or Chief Executive - let's make a bloody nuisance of ourselves until they take notice.

I agree with the Deputy Editor about Councillors public meetings - they now set the dreary agenda to discuss what they want and manage to avoid any difficult questions. Don't let them get away with it.

Finally I have to mention the police. Some of our old much loved keepers of the peace must be spinning in their graves. Such incompetence has caused a degree of mirth in the general population but the serious side is the apparent sight of people rushing about with big pots of whitewash while trantically filing their shoulders to a good slope.



A Cuban cycle challenge

Islander Maggie Battersby pedals to raise funds for Women for Women

ISLANDER Maggie Battersby has recently undertaken a gruelling cycle challenge in Cuba in aid of the Women for Women Charity.

Maggie who moved to the UK in 2006, works as a Trainer and Skills Officer for the Hereforshire Council and is studying for a Masters in education.

The chairman of the Women to Women charity is Professor Robert Winston who is also chairman of the Institute of Obstetrics and Gynaecology Trust. The charity provides funding to support women in research projects, involved in helping to identify causes and early signs of miscar-Some of the research funded by this charity has led to ongoing government funded prevention measures and monitoring One with which many are familiar with is the regular testing for cervical cancer that now takes place in many countries

Morning television presenter. Fern Britton, strongly supports the charity and has cycled many of the more recent challenges.

Maggie said the importance of this work was made very clear to her when she attended a day in London where she met with Professor Winston and was taken through the various ongoing research projects.

Maggie takes up the story and shares her experiences building up to the event and during the five day cycle ride.

My friend Nina asked me last year if I would join her on the ride. She was looking to do something which would challenge her both mentally and physically and the cause was one she felt was very worthwhile, although she was not too keen to do it by herself. Being a supportive type of friend and a bit of a mug... I agreed! We paid £250 a piece and then attempted to raise funds of £3,000 before September 2008. We ended up donating most of it ourselves, as raising money whilst holding down full time jobs and

attending the gym on a regular basis was a very difficult task. I guess in theory we failed the first challenge: how to get money out of people for charity! Not as easy at it may seem, and the work of this charity is so important to all of us.

In September, Nina and 1 attended a training event in the Cotswolds, where we pedalled up and down hills for a whole weekend covering more than 40 miles. It was here we met and made friends with a number of the other women undertaking the same challenge and we also learned the term 'undulation'. An undulation is a hill! sa mountain! And if there's 'only one to go," it usually means three!

So, having made the commitment, spent hours in the gym weight-lifting and spinning to build up the leg muscles and having paid a load of money, we left for Cuba from Heathrow in the early hours of November 21. At Heathrow we were joined by 78 other women of all shapes, sizes and ages, from all walks of life, and a camera man. We arrived in Cuba in the dark, with temperatures of 22C and spent the night

in a Havana hotel. We then spent the next day relaxing and travelling by coach to our start point at the Bay of Pigs.

On this journey I was interested to see our Falklands 'friend' the turkey buzzard. I was aware they populated areas of South America and are rife in the Amazon jungle, but wasn't expecting what appeared to be the exact same species this far north. They are locally known as... Yep! turkey buzzards! (although I expect they have a Spanish equivalent).

Nina's first challenge was the interesting accommodation of a concrete shack, with lots of insects. We shared a room for the entire trip, with me as chief bug catcher throughout!

That afternon we were fitted for bikes and a distinct pattern emerged. Each day started with us putting our 'daybags' on the coach - snacks, clothing etc at 6.45 am: 7.00am, start to queue for breakfast of omelette and tinned ham and fruit: 7.45 collect bikes and prepare for off, after a warm up exercise routine provided by Rhonda (volunteered for duty, as she was a gym instructor undertaking the challenge).

Day 1 - Bay of Pigs to Cienfuegos: The route was mainly flat with undulations and a very rough 35km, off road, through Zapata Peninsula National Park, crocodile country and some lovely pot holes, as well as some great stories of bush toileting!

One girl stopped to pee in a safe looking bush, away from the water. She had just dropped them, when a dog came roaring out of what she thought was a shed. She'd been about to pee in someone's garden! Peeing in the great outdoors was Nina's second challenge, as it was for many others. We stopped for lunch and shared it with local children, while donations we had brought with us for

hurricane victims were taken by the coach drivers, to be distributed in the areas of need.

In all, we covered 62km and ended the ride around 4pm at Yaguarmas where we put the bikes on a coach and were transferred to our hotel in Cienfuegos. We thought we'd done well and were, apparently, faster than Fern's group from the week before! The evening briefing revealed that the next day was hilly with 100km to cover.

Day 2: Cienfuegos to Trinidad: Started off with a slow incline leading to a hill while the weather started off very hot and windy.

Being a Falkland Islander, it normally takes a lot for me to say it is windy, but Cuba this day was in competition. Thankfully it wore off by lunch, or maybe it was because we were more than 50km further inland by then.

We suprised ourselves at the distance we could cover on roads rather than off-road. Having said that, the roads in Cuba are not like UK roads, the tarmac is patchy and inclined to pot holes - sound familiar?

By lunch time (rice and beans) the temperature was very hot and water was being poured over our heads at the stops.

Riding along with Kate and Janice, two friends from the Cotswold trip, we stopped to take a photo on a bridge and Kate took the opportunity to apply vaseline to areas that bear the brunt of the cycle seat. We were hailed by a man on a horse with a cheery 'Hola'! Any remaining dignity went right out the window!

At the last rest stop, 12km before the hotel the sun had started to drop. We were told that due to safety reasons, if we didn't make the hotel by dark, we'd have to get on the coach.

That was the kick I needed. Having spent most of the day in the middle of the long string of cyclists. I found energy I didn't know I had. I put the bike in the toughest gear, to make the most of each push on the pedals. I gained ground and arrived at the hotel with with the first 15 - it's not a race but when you're determined not to get on the bus...Phew!

The hotel on the Caribbean coast was lovely. 78 sweaty and very tired women were greeted with cocktails and salsa and some even found the energy to party into the night.


The evening briefing revealed that day three would bring more hills and a stop-off at a sugar mill. There's 73km to cover and then we can spend the afternoon looking around Trinidad.

New face for Malvina House Hotel in 2009

STANLEY'S largest hotel, Malvina House will more than double its bedroom capacity in 2009.

The historic building owned by Stanley Services Ltd will have its attractive façade extended to the West in the New Year confirmed Hotel Manager Carl Stroud. "There will be a twenty bedroom extension comprising double and twin ensuite rooms. Ten will face the seafront and ten will face south."

During the tourist season the hotel operates to near capacity, however the extension is necessary as business is often lost when large groups book, but are unable to stay at the hotel for their entire visit due to previous bookings taking up rooms. Morrisons (Falklands) Ltd will begin the groundwork shortly and the building of the extension will be undertaken by Dennis Harris of D H Building Service. "The kit for the extension is now on the Islands," Carl confirmed.

In the longer term it is also planned that the kitchen will be enlarged and upgraded with up-to-date and energy efficient facilities.

Tom Swales Managing Director of Stanley Services Limited noted that the development of the hotel is a real demonstration by the Company's shareholders of the positive future they see in the Islands economy. Mr Swales added that the investment meant keeping money in the Falkland Islands rather than it going overseas.

Carl said," As many will already know we have our new chef Matt Clarke, so the style of cooking at the restaurant has changed somewhat and has received a great many compliments already. Of course we are always keen to hear positive feedbacks so don't shy away from making suggestions for further im-

Carl was recently part of a Stanley Services Careers talk for Year 10's held at the Falkland Islands Community School: "It was great to be able to impress on the kids the opportunities for a career in the hotel industry, whether in catering or even management - after all I'm not going to be around for ever."

The Hotel has already proved itself as a training ground for Islander Shane Mitchell (17) who is studying catering at Chichester College: 'Shane undertook his NVQ I and a large part of his NVO 2 in our kitchen and he has told us that when he arrived at College he was well ahead of his class peers as a result."

Prompt action by fire service prevents threat to wildlife

TOURISTS from the Norwegian Sun visiting Gypsy Cove on Friday afternoon were treated not only to the sight of larger than usual numbers of penguins on the beach, but also to a display of how quickly the Stanley Fire and Rescue Service can respond.

Chief Fire Officer Gardner Fiddes reported that nine minutes after receiving news of smoke being seen coming from land close to Gyspsy Cove, the first fire fighter was on the scene, followed shortly afterwards by fire appliances including the main fire engine, the firefly and a water bowser.

Fortunately, the area where the fire had started had little vegetation. Mr Fiddes said if it had started just a few yards away, in an area of white grass, it could have spread very rapidly and threatened the penguin colony at Gypsy Cove.

Although the team of six fire fighters: Gardner Fiddess. Leon Mitchell, Gerard Jaffray, Edward Neilson. Roberto Ojeda and Geoff Loftus, soon had the fire under control, it took a lot of soaking the ground and chopping away at the peaty surface, before they could

be satisfied that it was totally extinguished.

Mr Fiddes said that a pumping appliance was kept on the scene until 4.30 pm and regular checks for any further outbreaks of the fire were maintained until 8pm.

Nothing has been found to indicate the source of the fire, but the chief suspect is thought to be a carelessly extinguished cigarette.








The evening concluded with a shared supper and a few drinks to mark the very special time of year.




