General Election signals a changing of the guard

AT least two new faces will join the ranks of councillors representing the Falkland Islands Government for its next four-year term.

With Richard Cockwell and Mike Rendell stepping down, and Janet Robertson undecided whether she will stand, the stage is set for a changing of the guard for the Legislative Assembly at the November 5 election.

Of the remaining councillors who served in the now dissolved Assembly, Ian Hansen and Richard Stevens (Camp) have both confirmed they will stand again, as have John Birmingham, Andrea Clausen and Mike Summers.

Others who have announced their intention to stand for election are Roger Edwards from Lake Sulivan on West Falkland and Sharon Halford from San Carlos on East Falkland for Camp. Jan Cheek, Jackie Cotter, Émma Edwards and Gavin Short have confirmed that they are standing for Stanley. Lewis Clifton, Mike Forrest and Eric Goss confirmed that they were still giving the matsome ter

Tim Thorogood consideration but had not reached a final

decision on whether to stand Those who are still consider-

ing standing for election have until October 15 to collect and return nomination papers to the Returning Officer, Tim Thorogood.

As with the previous Assembly, five members for Stanley and three for the Camp constituency will be elected. His Excellency the Governor declared the Assembly dissolved on Friday and appointed November 10 as the date for the first sitting of the new As-

Hill Cove and Port Howard on West Falkland and Hope Cottage on East Falkland will have polling units for a few hours.

Outer island residents need to apply to Mr Rowland to be added to the postal list and will receive their voting slip in the mail with collection by FIGAS prior to the election

As part of the Government's drive to make savings in all departments, the number of mobile polling stations has been reduced from previous elections.

The cost of chartering an Islander aircraft from FIGAS has increased from £500 to £900 per hour and has been taken into consideration when making arrangements for the Camp polling stations, said Mr Rowland.

At the last election in 2005, 69 per cent of Stanley voters turned out and 86 per cent of Camp constituents made their way to the polling stations. This was a slight increase on the 2001 turnout

In 2005 three members of the previous Legislative Council retained their seats. Richard Cockwell, Ian Hansen and Mike Summers were joined by Andrea Clausen, Richard Davies, Mike Rendell, Janet Robertson and Richard Stevens

There were 12 candidates competing for the five Stanley seats with five candidates for Camp.

FOR those of us who remember the Islands before minefields became a part of our lives, the idea that they could ever be made 100 per cent safe has always seemed a bit of a pipedream.

As I recall, of the many rapid changes following the Argentine occupation - and considering the chaotic way their forces scattered mines around our beaches and farmland - there was barely a mutter about the inconvenience and dangers of living in such close proximity to live ordnance. It was a small price to pay to remain British, and thankfully no human life has been lost since the field perimeters were established and fenced.

Recalling how at Fox Bay even 15 years after the war, there were unfenced areas I still rode, drove or walked around because I had an uneasy feeling about what could be lurking in the undergrowth or sand, I wonder how long it will take the cleared areas to become a real part of our lives again.

In next to no time there will be no trace of where the fences restricted access, and residents will be free to wander where they wish. For some however, those boundaries will remain imprinted on their minds forever, and I doubt they will ever set foot on the cleared areas.

If it wasn't for the continued political interference on a regular basis from across the water the removal of such an ugly reminder could be a form of closure for some, a chance to draw a line and move on. But that seems less likely now than for many years.

Some Islanders I've spoken to still feel guilty that the clearance is happening here when there are places in the world where children are maimed on a daily basis from mines.

However the ÚK, as a member of the Diana Princess of Wales championed Ottowa Treaty and a driving force behind mine clearance worldwide, have to be seen to be doing their bit in the only British Overseas Territory that still has minefields.

Besides stopping the production and development of antipersonnel mines, a party to the treaty must destroy all the antipersonnel mines in its possession within four years.

It might seem unnecessary to some of us that such a huge project is being geared up for the Falklands when there is little risk to residents, but when completed it might give Britain extra clout to ensure that more at-risk areas elsewhere in the world are made safe in the near future, which can only be a good thing.

We know from the past that when Britain signs a convention they, at least, stick to it.

Former EOD bosses to oversee de-mining

TWO former commanders of the Falklands EOD detachment arrived in the Islands yesterday as part of the De-mining Project Oflice (DPO) being established by the FCO.

Programme Manager, Robin Swanson and Technical Adviser Guy Marot are to oversee the demining programme scheduled for this summer.

The name of the company which has been awarded the demining contract is yet to be announced. However, it is expected that clearance of four sites at Surf Bay, Sapper Hill, Goose Green and Fox Bay (East) will start in early November and be completed by the end of the summer.

C King has been contracted by the FCO to set up the DPO in Stanley. Their main role is to exercise quality control and quality assurance over the de-mining contractor's activities, so that Islanders and the FCO can be sure that the programme is carried out to the standards set by the National Mine Action Authority. said a Government House spokesperson.

A number of jobs in support of the de-mining project are expected to be advertised locally and the demining contractor will rely on the support of local companies for accommodation and supplies.

The FCO have passed on their thanks to the Falkland Islands Government and Islanders for their assistance and advice during the procurement process, and looks forward to further close collaboration. The Falkland Islands Government will continue to participate in the National Mine Action Authority, which will oversee the de-mining activity from London.

Missing shotgun was found at Goose Green

A GOOSE Green resident was ordered to carry out a total of 180 hours of community service this week after he pleaded guilty to theft by finding, and possessing a firearm without a licence.

Rodolfo Tellez was sentenced to 180 hours community service for the theft, and 100 hours for possessing a shotgun without a licence, to run concurrently. He was also ordered to pay £70 prosecution costs.

Crown Counsel Elliott Taylforth said the shotgun, belonging to Colin Ford, was taken to a two-nighter at Goose Green by his son Daniel Ford and went missing at some point between May 1-2.

Mr Tellez was arrested after Police received a report he had been seen with the gun. He cooperated fully with the police, and said he hadn't previously handed

Good news and no news

POWER problems at the Mount Sussex radio transmitter have now been resolved and radio services have been resumed in that area.

FIG would like to thank Cable and Wireless for their assistance in solving this problem and also thank BFBS for their continued hard work in resolving the challenging issues they are frequently faced with.

FIRS listeners will however have noticed that the hourly news from BFBS, broadcast as part of the FIRS sequence, has recently gone from noisy to non-existent. in the firearm, as he was frightened he would be accused of the theft itself.

Mr Taylforth said: "He's had it for a long time, he should have done something positive with it, rather than keeping it for his own use."

Defence Lawyer Jocelyne Hindmarsh said Mr Tellez did not feel he could hand the item to the police for fear that he would be blamed for the crime, and that he had originally intended to give the shotgun to Keith Alazia, as the "only person he trusted enough."

However, Mr Alazia was absent from Goose Green and, by the time he returned, the defendant had forgotten it was there, Miss Hindmarsh said.

She said he was "extremely remorseful about the circumstances he finds himself in" and felt stupid for his actions.

BFBS Station manager Stuart Holmes said that unfortunately the news feed relied on the transmission link between MPA and FIRS, which had now degraded beyond its designed performance specifications.

The antennas and feed cables for this link are on a tower at Sapper Hill that has been condemned for many years, preventing access for repairs.

Mr Holmes said BFBS was actively investigating an alternative way to present a reliable news feed to FIRS.

Hundreds preparing for Darwin ceremony

HUNDREDS of Islanders have been involved in the massive logistical operations surrounding the Argentine next of kin visits over the next two Saturdays.

A total of 375 relatives will be visiting – 170 tomorrow and 205 on October 10 – together with representatives of the Argentine Families Commission and media.

Two requests for charter planes to carry additional Argentine journalists have been refused permission to fly to the Falklands.

The joint military and civilian operation to prepare for the two visits has been overseen by Government House, with elected representatives.

Governor Alan Huckle said noone from Falkland Islands Government would be attending in an official capacity, and nor did he believe would anyone from the Argentine Government. A number of marquees have been erected close to the cemetery, and the service will be conducted inside the tents in the event of inclement weather. Father Peter Norris of St Mary's will assist in conducting mass.

Buses will ferry relatives, media and officials between MPA and the cemetery to coincide with the 9.40am arrival and 3.40pm departure of the LAN aircraft. Islanders wishing to attend the 11.45am ceremony will be advised of parking arrangements by police.

Mr Huckle said all Argentines would have their passports stamped on arrival at MPA: "They have all been told they must carry valid internationally recognised passports to come here, and their passports will be stamped in the normal way."

Mr Huckle said government officials, private companies and

individuals and the military had spent a great deal of time assisting in the preparations. He also hoped the arrangements would allow for a suitably dignified event.

"We've planned as far as we can," he said. "I hope everything goes well because the important thing is for the Argentine next of kin to be able to come to the cemetery and have a dignified quiet time so they can remember their sons or nephews in proper dignity.

nity. "That's the main purpose. It's a humanitarian visit. But it has required a tremendous amount of organisation and I'm very grateful to everybody who has helped and assisted Government House in hopefully making this a success."

A wall is to be crected close to the cemetery in the coming weeks to accommodate plaques from the relatives. The visit has been paid for by the Argentine Government.

Loligo closes

THE second Loligo season closed earlier than expected this month with total catches just over 31,000 tonnes. Director of Fisheries John Barton said the early closure was due to conservation reasons but the catches were by no means as low as they had been in the past. The second season normally runs from mid July to the end of September but closed on September 11, with just one vessel remaining in the zone to carry out experimental fishing. Ideally the fleet would like to be catching in the region of 45,000 tonnes in a good year over both seasons.

Plan charges

THE proposed new scheme to charge for planning applications is to be considered by Executive Council. The Committee are seeking agreement from Executive Council to "consult with the building industry, recent applicants, developers and the general public, on whether fees should be charged for applications for planning permission and building permits" Graham France told the Penguin News.

Governor's Argentine message

Governor Alan Huckle this week gave his first interview to Clarin, Argentina's biggest newspaper. This translation is by the British Embassy...

Do you believe that this is the worst moment in relations with Argentina since 1990?

I'm not going to comment on that but, in the past, the Argentine government cooperated with the United Kingdom under what we call the "sovereignty umbrella" in areas of mutual advantage.

That has become more difficult because the Argentine Government took action against the matter of hydrocarbons (it cancelled the agreements) and fishing licences.

There is no doubt that the Governments of Great Britain and the Falklands want to have better relations with Argentina, which includes fish conservation and commerce, and to advance in regional cooperation as long as sovereignty is not compromised.

Argentina cannot abandon that claim to sovereignty, and from the Islands little or nothing has been conceded, beginning with the refusal to allow Acrolineas Argentinas to fly here?

In the first place Argentines can visit the Islands using LAN Chile on the route from Punta Arenas, via cruise ships and by private flights. But Islanders still look back (referring to the time before the war of '82) to when Argentina controlled all air communications

and the supply of petroleum to the Islands.

And they don't want to revert to that situation where Argentina would have a similar influence.

But that does not mean to say that the Islands, the same as the United Kingdom, might not want to hold conversations over air links with Argentina at some time.

And the unilateral advance by the United Kingdom of Great Britain over natural resources such as squid fishing or the search for petroleum in waters around the Islands?

I'm not sure that the Islands and the United Kingdom have to discuss with Argentina questions internal to the Islands.

As far as petroleum is concerned, there was an agreement over a particular area. And there is nothing over how to manage fishing on an internal level.

As I understand it, Argentina is also considering the new system for fishing which is being applied here because it is better for fish conservation. What do you think of the call for dialogue over the sovereignty of the (Islands) as by Mercosur, Unasur, Arab organisations, Africans and the UN?

The United Kingdom is certain of its sovereignty over the Falkland Islands. The United Nations recognises the right to self-determination. And that principle underlies British policy towards all (its) overseas territories.

The Islanders are, and wish to remain, British. While that remains the case, the United Kingdom will protect them. The idea that the Falklands are a colony and that Great Britain wants total control over them is a thing of the past.

Would London permit more ceremonies by families of the Argentine dead in the war at the Darwin cemetery like the one this Saturday and on the 10th?

The relatives are very welcome. On this occasion we have not been able to have all the people who wanted to come, in part because we don't have the logistical capacity for so large a ceremony.

The Government of the Islands has communicated its willingness (to have) visits like these in March or April 2010 in order to solve (the question) of those who couldn't come.

Of course, a new Legislative Assembly could say no, but if everything goes well, without too much emotion, I don't see why not. Of course, this is also a matter for the Argentine Government, because it is paying the bill.

FIH pre tax loss

FALKLAND Oil and Gas Ltd this week reported a pre-tax loss of \$3.1 million for the six months ended June 30, up from \$2.2 million a year earlier. The oil and gas exploration company focuses on its extensive licence areas to the South and East of the Falkland Islands, and says it is well placed to move into the next phase of exploration.

Rugby meeting

W1TH the prospect of a Festival of Rugby in the Falklands in December 2009, Stanley Leisure Centre is looking to re-introduce the sport to the islands. There will be a meeting for interested people, looking toward redeveloping a rugby club in the Falklands, in the Geography Room of the Community School on Tuesday October 6, at 7pm.

First cruisers

THE first cruise ship of the season is due in Stanley this weekend. Ushuaia carrying 90 passengers will call at FIPASS on Saturday. The Veendam, carrying 1629 passengers, is the first big ship due to arrive in Stanley, on November 27.

Air area error

IN last week's story from the Legislative Assembly (Worsening ties with Argentina) we referred to the Special Area Corporation as "air corporation." The error is regretted.

Auction heralds launch of Islands support line

SEALED bids close today for a charity auction which will help fund the Islands' first dedicated telephone support line.

The auction is just one of a number of fundraisers organised by Team Tranquil to promote its new Listening and Support Line - a weekly service to be launched next Saturday (October 10) - and to help promote World Mental Health Week

A free all-ages dance is being staged at the Town Hall tomorrow afternoon, and tickets for the group's supper dance, also on October 10, are selling fast.

The auction comprises 14 lots, from felt work to art work, social evenings at Government House, a VIP day at MPA and a weekend getaway to Pebble Island Lodge.

A complete list is on display at the Post Office, and bids may be deposited at PO Box 500.

Team Tranquil members Karen Rimicans, community psychiatric nurse, and Ruth Taylor, a retired learning support assistant in special needs, said the Listening and Support Line was an important initiative for the whole community.

The support line is for anyone in any form of distress, for any reason," said Ms Rimicans.

The line will be staffed by lay volunteers trained by the Samarítans, and will initially operate from 8pm to midnight on Saturdays. The number is 51515 and calls from landlines are free.

Ms Rimicans also emphasised calls would be confidential and non-judgemental:. "We are not there to judge peo-

ple or give professional advice, but to give emotional support," she said. "And we can signpost people towards an appropriate professional agency.

She said various agencies, such social welfare and police, alas

ready took many calls, and the Listening and Support line would offer an important and new alternative: "There is evidence to show if people have these services they do use them," she said. "We are confident we will get callers."

Mrs Taylor added: "The support line is for anybody, whether they are children, adults, civilians or military personnel - anyone who has a problem they feel they can't cope with and wants to share that anxiety. We have such a mixture of people living in the Falklands now, not everyone has someone to turn to. People can feel very isolated.

While Team Tranquil already has about 20 listeners aged from their 20s to 60s, members are keen to recruit more volunteers, especially from younger people.

We also have a Spanish listener, and we welcome listeners from all areas and all cultures in the Islands," said Ms Rimicans. "The funds we raise will be used to support the line and to organise more training so we can sign up more people.

The winning bids for the auction will be announced during the Team Tranquil supper dance at the FIDF Hall, a multicultural feast of food and dance to celebrate four of the Islands main cultures: Islander, St Helenian, Chilean and Filipino.

Dinner includes dishes from each of the four nationalities, and entertainment is provided by Scottish and Chilean dance groups. SWN and Len McGill of the Fighting Pigs.

FIGAS manager Shaun Minto **FIGAS** shuttle schedule met with a whinge and a prayer

LAST year, six decades after the establishment of the Falkland Islands Government Air Service (FIGAS), the historical "taxi service" was replaced with a subsidised "shuttle service"

After a one year trial the East-West, Northern and Southern shuttle begins in earnest this week with the launch of the summer flying programme for 2009/10.

During summer, the shuttle service is divided into morning and afternoon shifts comprising two shuttle runs each. The morning shift consists of an East-West Shuttle (0800) and a Northern or Southern Shuttle (1030).

The afternoon shift includes a Southern or Northern Shuttle (1400) and an East-West Shuttle (1730). Particular demand would allow for a second aircraft to fly a Northern and/or Southern Shuttle run

While customers will effectively no longer be able to book a flight to suit themselves, advantages include seven-day flying and Westers will have access to same day returns to and from the East. Likewise passengers from Stanley can spend a full day on the West without the need to arrange overnight accommodation.

For those whose requirements cannot be accommodated by the shuttle service (such as tourist groups) there exists the rather more expensive Air Charter service.

FIGAS also now offers the LAN Air Charter (as opposed to the LAN "taxi service") where passengers arriving on the Saturday LAN flight have the option of transferring from Mount Pleasant Airport to

destinations outside of Stanley.

Again, an expensive option, but one that means passengers need not spend a night in Stanley, or an extended wait in Stanley, prior to onward destinations in the Falklands.

Last season with the shuttle service. FIGAS achieved the great-est total revenue since 2003/2004.

However, all is not rosy with some of the clientele.

While FIGAS manager Shaun Minto has delivered the lowest cash expenditure since 2005/06. following the ditching of the Air Taxi model, a number of island destination owners claim the system is "inflexible" and that their clients are inconvenienced.

Suzan Pole-Evans from Saunders Island said her visitors lost half a day out of their weekend because of the late check-in for Islander aircraft to their destination

Arlette Bloomfield from Falkland Islands Holidays in Stanley added: "Many of my groups are a minimum of eight passengers and therefore we are having to charter a flight to accommodate the numbers over and above six.

UK operators who have been selling the islands for many years." However, Mr Minto said:

"Since the FIGAS Recovery Action Plan was first proposed, it has been consistently stated that organisations whose primary business model relies on FIG providing heavily subsidised air transport will suffer unless they adapt to the new FIGAS two-tier operating model."

He said the majority of tourist passengers transported by FIGAS were clients of International Tours and Travel (ITT) and Falkland Islands Holidays (FIH).

"There is a marked difference in the way these two agencies have adapted," he said. "ITT has specifically re-quested the Combo Charter op-

tion whenever possible, to ensure that their group clients can travel at similar times.

"FIH has specifically requested that whenever possible their group clients be split between the morning and afternoon shuttles to ensure that cost of the service is minimised. No doubt there will be many complaints from both tourists and lodge owners regarding groups being split and arriving at their destinations many hours apart.

But let there be no mistake. This is entirely due to the requests made by FIH, and presumably by the organisers of the tour groups themselves."

The McGills at Carcass Island are destination owners who suffer from groups being split.

Rob McGill said: "Now, when there is a big group coming or going it means the second part of the group have to wait until the afternoon, and this doesn't always please them."

Sea Lion Lodge manager Jenny Luxton agreed: "I of course do not like the south-north shuttle system. Guests are either hanging around here until after lunch or don't get here until mid afternoon. Then they have lost most of that day, especially if they are here only one night, which some are.'

Increased transiting through Stanley was also a bugbear with the majority of those who spoke to the Penguin News, although Sally Ellis of ITT had a different point of view; "We have had no particular problems." she said.

"In fact it's easier to give clear timings to clients with the new shuttle system.

"It helps that most of our clients are new and don't know the old system and old prices, so can't make comparisons. I think it works quite well. We just have to accept that change has to happen and work with it."

How the Falklands fleet has developed

THE Falkland Islands Government Air Service was established in 1948 on the initiative of the Governor, Sir Miles Clifford, who was inspired by an article in a magazine about Australia's Flying Doctor Service.

Upset by the islolation of many of the Islands' inhabitants he decided that such a set-up might also meet the

needs of the Falklands population. The very first flight in one of two secondhand ex-military Auster aircraft, bought in Britain for only £700 each, took off from Stanley racecourse on Decem-ber 19. Since that day, and using a variety of different aircraft, FIGAS has served as an air-ambulance, a passenger air-taxi, a freight and postal

service, a flying teacher service, and later, as a fisheries patrol. For many years FIGAS relied on de Havilland Beaver float-planes but, in 1981, the first of the Britten-Norman BN-2 Islander aircraft that now constitute the current fleet were purchased. During the Falklands War in 1982 all of the aircraft were destroyed, and immediately after FIGAS carried out a helicopter service using a captured Argentine Bell UH1 painted in FIGAS colours. Sadly when damage was discovered to the airframe the service stopped soon after. The fleet of aircraft was

then built up to its current level of five over a period of years during the 1980s. Source: H.Briley Penguin News, October 2, 2009

Challenging new track gives Motocross season a perfect kick-start

WHITE sands, a magnificent mountain backdrop and the sort of weather that had the spectators flocking to Long Island gave the first Motocross event of the season the kick-start it deserved.

For the third race sponsored by Sea View Ltd, the entire racing area was visible from a peat bank which formed a natural viewing area of the track that took in a jump, hairpin bends, rough ground, loose sand and as the day wore on, mud, glorious mud.

Stefen Clarke on his CRF450 excelled in the first Clubmans race although he claimed to have "just got lucky" at the start, when he took the lead and convincingly held on to it. Stefen however elected to go into the second Experts race rather than claim his position in the Clubmans. Dylan Stephenson maintained the high standard he demonstrated last season and was placed first, while Ryan Shillitoe in his very first race rode his way to second; Robert Duncan was third.

The atmosphere was practically buzzing as the Experts took to the track for a practice before their first race. Shane Blackley, who competed in the Welsh Enduro in 1997 and 1998, was back after a ten year absence from the track and with a new Yamaha WR450F.

Jamie Peck, another racer from the days when Motocross reached its peak, was also back in the pit and looking steely eyed with determination.

Old favourites such as Jay Moffatt, Andrew Alazia and Steve McGeough were joined by Robert Ferguson, Scott Henry-Roberts and Peterkin Mittens.

As the bikes screamed up the straight from the start Shane took the lead and looked set to stay there as his old style slipped easily into place. Jay Moffatt however was dogging his heels. Jay was like a cat with a mouse and on the fourth lap he saw a gap and grabbed it with



both hands. Scott Henry-Roberts and Jamie Peck took advantage of Shane's reduction in speed to ease ahead and Robert Ferguson also took his place up front. The battle commenced and places kept changing. Jay had found his comfort zone and looked set to hold the number one spot with Jamie and Robert keeping the pressure on. He crossed the line with Robert tucked in behind him and Jamie and Shane in third and fourth place.

Jay said plan A had been to take an early lead and not be eating sand, but when he found himself stuck behind Shane he thought he would wait for him to tire. "I was starting to think he was a lot fitter than he had made out." he said.

Out of the saddle for more than a decade, Shane explained that the relatively rough track and the speed had made his arms go numb and then he had lost the grip in his hands. "I had to cut the speed or risk coming off for a few laps," he said

Robert Ferguson had earned his second place with some determined riding, despite a fall which had lost him precious seconds (one to watch out for throughout the season though).

In the second Clubman, Robert Duncan, who had found the Expert class a bit fierce the previous season, took an early lead and held on to it. As he established his own track up the loose sand on the beach the laps quickened, and his confidence with the rest of the track increased. It was a first win for Robert who said he had really enjoyed the race, although the jump was a bit hard on the suspension of his CRE250.

Ryan and Dylan had again run a good race and took second and third respectively.

The question all were asking as the Experts prepared for their second race, was how 18year-old Stefen would fare, up there with the big boys.

Again he was straight off the mark for a flying start and looked set to stay there. Finding Andrew Alazia on his tail must have been a daunting prospect, but he kept his cool until a tumble took Andrew out of the running and Shane took up the veteran's position. Jay got into the race, overtook Shane and went for a stylish overtake off the straight and in the loose Jamie Peck tackles the hazardous turn off the beach in soft sand sand to take the lead . He succeeded for a split second but hit the deck and had trouble restarting his \$510. Jamie Peck proceeded to fight his way to second place and Stefen had a very real race on his hands with two more experienced riders pushing the pace and Scott Henry- Roberts riding like there was no tomorrow.

The rain started, but the crowd's excitement was never dampened and roars of encouragement and tooting vehicle horns urged the riders to push their skills and endurance levels to the limit. Stefen never faltered and screamed past the finish line with Scott and Jamie taking second and third. Shane, Robert and Andrew took the final places in the race that left spectators looking forward to the next meet at the Ponds Track on October 25.

Q SOME books published about the Falklands War occasionally state that Argentine next of kin were not permitted to visit the Argentine cemetery until sometime after the end of the war. Some say it was not until 1991, some say 1993. Is it not a fact that Argentine next of kin have always been allowed to visit, in fact at any time after the surrender in 1982?

A Councillor Mike Summers. provided the following response. AFTER the war in 1982 the Argentine Government was given the opportunity to repatriate all their war dead to Argentina for burial. This offer was refused.

From 1982 until the Madrid Accord of 1990 there was no UK diplomatic representation in Argentina (and no Argentine representation in the UK), and there were no next of kin visits. I do not believe there were any requested or refused.

Following the Madrid agreement, and under ICRC auspices, a visit was organised for 354 Argentine NoK to visit the Darwin cemetery on March 18 1991. A second organised visit took place from October 31-November 1 1995. when 11 NoK visited the memo-

rial and war grave of five members of the Argentine Air Force who had crash-landed on Pebble Island.

Organised visits started to take place on a more regular basis in 1997, using charter flights from Argentina. The first was from January 22-23 1997, involving 15 NoK

They then took place on the following dates: Feb 20-21 and Nov 19-20 1997: Jan 21-22. Feb 18-19 and Nov 1998; Jan 13-14, Feb 17-18 and Mar 17-18 1999. Each of these consisted of 15 NoK and a priest, on aircraft chartered by the Argentine Government.

The July 1999 Agreement allowed for the first time Argentine passport holders to visit the Falklands with our special permission.

There were two organised visits on the LAN flight consisting of 25 NoK and seven others on the following dates: October 16-23 1999 and November 13-20 1999.

After this, FIG stopped keeping specific records of NoK hecause the visits were no longer being formally organised.

The resumption of the LAN flight, and the lifting of the ban on Argentine passport holders, meant that any Argentines could visit the Islands as often as they wanted, so organised visits with charter

flights were no longer necessary However, we are aware that between February 2000 and December 2007 there were 18 visits of groups of between 10 and 25 persons, and large numbers of Argentines visiting by cruise vessel. The most recent visit has been complicated because a) Argentina unilaterally banned all charter flights to the Falklands from 2002 onwards; and b) the request for a large number for an inauguration of the reconstructed cemetery at Darwin.



FIDC board reluctantly accepts freight subsidy

THE board of Falkland Islands Development Corporation has reluctantly accepted an Executive Council decision to make FIDC funds available for a freight subsidy to farmers.

At an extraordinary meeting on September 24, ExCo decided to leave ferry tariffs as they were and instructed FIDC to provide a transport subsidy to deliver a tariff of £11,50 per linear metre on commercial vehicles for the cost of transporting livestock to Sand Bay, and bales of wool to FIPASS or Mare Harbour for export.

While FIDC General Manager David Waugh had the support of his board in expressing disapproval of the decision, the organisation seemed obliged to comply under existing Ordinance.

Mr Waugh said the ExCo decision was contrary to FIDC recommendations put before them, and he was still trying to "get to the bottom of the rationale" behind it.

FIDC had recommended ExCo accept proposals concerning Concordia Bay and wool transport, which Mr Waugh said were in the best interests of developing a sustainable economy and an effective and competitive rural transportation system. But the FIDC proposals were

But the FIDC proposals were rejected, partly because of a growing sense of unease among farmers in Camp, and because other methods of accessing central funding were not available due to the imminent dissolution of government in the lead-up to the November 5 election.

"Although ExCo has every right to make different decisions and is fully empowered under the Ordinance to instruct FIDC as it chooses, I strongly question the validity of having an economic development agency that should be operating strategically and effectively to grow and diversify the national economy with limited resources, but is at the same time obligated to administer, deliver and fund any decision that ExCo may take at any time," said Mr Waugh

He said the subsidy was expected to cost FIDC in the region of £18,000 to £20,000, and could potentially come out of the 2010/ 11 financial year, but it brought administration and funding issues for the corporation.

FIDC board member Mike Forrest questioned whether they should just "sit back and take it."

But former Legislative Assembly member John Birmingham assured the board ExCo had not acted in anyway outside its authority: "According to the Acting Attorney General it is all above board," he said.

Mr Birmingham said because a Standing Finance Committee could not be held there was no access to FIG central funding and the subsidy arrangement was a short term solution to a situation which had created a low level of confidence in the farming community as they went into the season.

Board member Tony Blake said the decision to pay the subsidy retrospectively would still impact on farmers' budgets. Government Chief Executive

Government Chief Executive Tim Thorogood said it was accepted the measure was not welcomed in terms of the governance of it.

"We'll have to wait and see when the bill comes in and have dialogue with the new Assembly," he said.

IT was a weekend of extremes, with two traditional dates on the Falklands calendar coinciding with an event which has tested international relations and threatened to reopen old wounds.

First, there was the final two nighter of the winter, which for generations has held significance for those who live among some of this country's most beautiful but harsh surrounds.

Originally established as a means by which farmers could gather themselves, as opposed to their stock, these country corrals are a celebration of life in Camp.

At Fox Bay there was double the settlement's normal population inside the Club, a series of barbecues to swap yarns and eatch up with old mates, and a cross-country rally involving some seriously smart driving to the top of Mount Philomel.

There was even an opportunity for visiting townies to celebrate Peat Cutting Day, albeit a day early, by grabbing a spade and slicing a few blackened sods out of the ground, under the guidance of those who still earn a crust for such efforts.

Back in the capital, a couple of hundred were donning their posh frocks and best bibs and braces at the Falklands Conservation Ball, arguably the highlight of the country's social calendar.

With food, drink, music and fundraising high on the agenda – in much the same way as at Fox Bay Club, only on a larger scale – here was yet another wonderful excuse to mingle and make merry, as Islanders do so well.

Meanwhile, after literally years of diplomatic negotiations, 170 relatives of those Argentines killed on Falklands soil were able to honour their dead at the inauguration of their memorial at Darwin Cemetery.

Hundreds of people living in the Falklands, from government and the military to business and individuals, helped make it happen.

And all those with a level head on their shoulders will be satisfied its humanitarian aims were respected, at least on this side of the water, with no hint of belligerent xenophobia.

Such is life in the Falklands: a diverse and rich mix of tradition, celebration and emotional challenge, all of which is a credit to this country's tremendous spirit, camaraderie and resilience.

It was my privilege to attend the Fox Bay two nighter, and to come away with something equally priceless – new friendships that didn't exist before I was ferried across the Sound to the West for the first time.

Demining officers set up local base

A LONG process of quality assurance checks to give a high level of confidence hes ahead of the contractor who takes up the minefield clearance role at four separate sites on East and West Falkland next month...

Overseeing the project and ensuring the work is carried out to International Mine Action Standards are C King Associate Ltd's Technical Advisor Guy Marot and Programme Manager Robin Swanson, who now are in the process of setting up the Demining Project Office (DPO) in Stanley.

At the time of going to print the company contracted to carry out the clearance of four minefields this summer had not been named.

It is the DPO's task to oversee the quality of the work carried out by the demining contractor. An accreditation process was carried out on the four shortlisted companies who tendered for the contract.

A further accreditation which includes a "dress rehearsal" will take place when the successful company arrives in the Falklands. All equipment will be checked and each individual searcher confirmed as properly able to carry out the work, said Mr Marot.

"We have the right to spot check any part of the operation at any time," he said, adding that if there was anything discovered on a routine check that reduced confidence in any way, a research would be carried out at the contractor's expense.

"It's no good taking the fences down and nobody wanting to go on the land," he said

Mr Swanson said there was a long process of quality assurance and checks ahead, which would ensure a high level of confidence and culminate in a demonstration where the deminers would walk across the cleared areas.

In the meantime, the two former EOD commanders who both served in the Falklands in the 1980s are busy establishing an office to the rear of their rented residence at Ten Acres.


Residents who may want to find out more about the technical side of the operation and the equipment used are very welcome to call in, said Mr Swanson.

Families pay homage at graves of war dead

ON a typical Falklands spring day, 170 relatives of Argentine war dead arrived at their memorial at Darwin to remember their loved ones and take part in a service to inaugurate the cemetery.

The majority of the first group was made up of relatives from crew members who went down with the cruiser General Belgrano and whose names, as all Argentines killed in the conflict, are engraved in 24 plaques at the memorial.

The arrangements put in place for the tirst of two visits worked well, and the tight schedule was maintained in a quiet and dignified manner, as befits such an occasion.

The inauguration service began at midday after the families had paid their respects at graves of relatives. While many of the graves are unmarked, they have been "adopted" over the years by families, and all were adorned with rosary beads and flowers.

During the service, conducted by Father Sebastian Combin representing the Roman Catholic church in Argentina and Father Peter Norris of St Mary's in Stanley, the cemetery was blessed and mourners placed personal mementos in an urn of remembrance. Commander of British Forces, Air

Commodore Gordon Moulds, and Paul Martinez for the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, greeted the Argentine families at Mount Pleasant Airport and attended the service. No one from the Falkland Islands Government attended in an official capacity.

As the aircraft prepared for departure from Mount Pleasant, the Argentine Families Commission President Hector Omar Cisneros addressed the group, and a round of applause was offered up for the Islanders who had helped organise the visit, as well as LAN for its assistance in getting the families to the Falklands.

"We are most grateful to the governments of Argentina and Britain for having allowed us to go ahead with the homage, and to the Islanders for having left aside wounds of the past," said Mr Cisneros.

"The display and support from the British military was perfect and very much appreciated," he said.

He also said the Families Commission was particularly grateful to the people of the Islands who had always been "so warm, respectful and helpful."

At the request of the families, the Argentine press kept to the conditions agreed for the visit, with no Argentine flags, no national hymns and nothing that could spoil the spirit of the day.

It was a very emotional day, said Mr Cisneros: "A day for the families to reflect and be intimate with their beloved."

Tomorrow a further visit of 205 Argentine relatives will take place and a statue of "Our Lady of Lujan" will be carried at shoulder height from the car park to the cemetery where a further inauguration will take place during the service.

Mr Martinez said the first visit had gone very well with only a few areas that needed tightening up on.

The media reporting in Argentina had been "pretty positive," he said, and he hoped that all would go equally as well tomorrow.

The weather forecast however does not look so favourable and more shelter may have to be provided, he said.

Election choices

JANET Robertson has confirmed she will stand for election to the Legislative Assembly on November 5, while Eric Goss said he would decide soon. Glenn Ross confirmed he was standing while Kevin Ormond said he had intended to, but had too many commitments at the moment. Mike Forrest also said he was not now standing. The Penguin News was unable to contact Lewis Clifton, another person thought to be considering standing.

Rise in Desire

DESIRE Petroleum shares were up 0.2 per cent to 99¼p, and Rockhopper Exploration was down 4.5 per cent at 85½p on Wednesday, amid talk the exploration companies were attempting to raise up to £100 milion to help finance their drilling programmes in the Falklands. Traders said Desire was looking to raise £50m via an issue of new shares at 75p a share and Rockhopper up to £50m at a price yet to be determined.

Fake £1 coins

FAKE £1 coins are circulating in the Falklands. Inspector Len McGill of Royal Falkland Islands Police said only a few had been reported to the police and he did not think there was a massive amount in circulation. One type of coin depicts the three lions and is dated 2002. They are not easily recognised but do have a slightly duller sound when tapped against a genuine coin.

Date mistake

THE moratorium on the receipt of PRP applications first came into effect on 26 January 2007 for one year, and then was further extended several times until its lifting on October 1, 2009. In the September 25, PN it was reported in error that the moratorium had been in place since January 2008.

Big bucks

IN a nod to the luxury cruiser industry, Chile's government says it will invest more than US\$180 million to improve and expand tourism infrastructure to convince foreign travellers to visit the country.

Missing pengy

ONE of the "guests" at the Falklands Conservation Ball was kidnapped on Friday night, and organisers are offering a reward for their safe return. The victim is described as a magellanic penguin, made by students at the Community School.

An organic future for wool sales

FALKLANDS farmers could be earning premium prices if their wool is officially recognised as organic, according to FIG Agriculture Advisor Ian Campbell.

"Many large textile manufacturers are now looking at manufacturing organic textiles and clothing, and sourcing organic raw products is the first vital step for them." he said. "Wool production on the Falkland Islands is mostly grown organically as standard practice. However, only by using an internationally recognised and audited scheme can the wool be sold as organic."

Dr Andrew Monk, from the Biological Farmers of Australia, visited the Falklands last week to look at the progress of organic accreditation. Ten farms are at various stages of accreditation in collaboration with this Australian certification authority.

"Children love rhyme, rhythm and repetition." health visitor Miranda McKee said, which help them develop their language skills.

Bookstart was established by the UK charity the Booktrust in 1997, and has been established in the Islands since 2004. With the help of funding from Cable and Wireless and Fortuna Ltd, Falklands health visitors provide packs of books for babies and children at nine months, two and three years,

The aim, Mrs McKee said, "is to inspire an interest in books, and hopefully a love of reading, while discovering books are a fun way of spending time together."

Planning permission granted for seventeen applicants this month

WITH 18 applications for planning permission, this month's Planning and Building Committee meeting was the longest for quite some time.

It included a further review of the Environmental Planning Officer's reports on the possible introduction of fees for specific planning and building services (PN, September 4 and October 2). Members of the committee agreed to seek agreement from ExCo to consult with the building industry, recent applicants, developers and the public on the proposal.

Four applications were for the erection of polytunnels, three of which were for siting on domestic properties. This was due to either their size (in excess of 25 square metres), as they were positioned within 10 metres of another house not within the same curtilage, or within five metres of a highway.

All four applications, at Stanley House Garden for the Hostel, 10 Fitzroy Road for Falkland Berntsen, 22 James Street for Roy Buckett, and 19 Biggs Road for Evan Jones were approved.

Three applicants sought permission in principle for the erection of dwellings and all were approved. The first was submitted by Zaza and Natasha Elbakidze for land to the rear of 1 Racecourse Road, and the second by Robert and Joanna Bryson on the land to the rear of 1 Goss Road at the junction of H Jones Road. Both received two letters of objection, with the latter also receiving a letter of support for the proposal. The third application was from Peter and Joan Morrison for land at 3 Felton Court.

Three applications for erection of garages were approved: Trevor Berntsen's at 6 McKay Close, Mark Stroud's at 10 Sulivan Street and Nigel Bishop and Tansy Newman's at 5 Jersey Road - the latter to include a home office.

Receiving conditional planning permission was a mobile catering unit at the Jetty Visitor Centre for Christine McKay, a change of use of workshop and garage to a dwelling at 5 Davis Street for Allan White and Jacqui Jennings, and the change of use of part of The Entertainment Centre in the West Store to a cafeteria for the Falkland Islands Company.

Also conditionally granted was Peter McKay's proposal to change the use of a garage at 21 Ross Road West to a dwelling, a new dwelling on land to the rear of 27 Fitzroy Road for Paul Chapman, a change of use of part of 24 Goss Road to form a self-contained bedsit for Carol Cant, and the renewal of temporary planning permission for the siting of a Portakabin at 6 Fitzroy Road by Allan Cruikshank.

Sheena Benjamin's proposal for the erection of a dwelling on land north of 10 Allardyce Street was refused planning permission, as the committee considered it was over-development of the site.

Dairy house and one paddock to be leased

THE Development Corporation Board has approved in principle that the Stanley Dairy house and a paddock suitable for one or two horses should be leased while the business and property is being sold off.

FIDC General Manager David Waugh said the land would not be sold off in the near future as the area was one of the sites listed as a possibility for the proposed new port.

The division and parcelling of the land, house and farm buildings will be considered by the board at a later. more appropriate time.

Following the decision to close the dairy as a business, all of the livestock has been re-homed, including three cats. A total of £3,227.98 has been raised from animal sales, said FIDC's Charlene Rowland in an update to the board on Monday.

Thirty-eight of the cows, heifers and calves have been trans-

ported to North Arm where it is believed the majority of the animals will be used for settlement milk cows.

Two further sales of removable assets have generated revenue of $\pounds 20.750$ and the milking equipment still at the dairy has been put out to tender internationally. Some interest had been shown, although no tenders had been received to date, said Mr Waugh.

Mrs Rowland said in her report that several people had expressed an interest in short-term leasing of the land. However, due to the paddocks and some of the fencing being in poor condition and the need to rest and regenerate the pasture, lease of all the paddocks for grazing was not an option at the moment. Periodic checks are made by staff to ensure there are no breakins or other disturbances.

However, a board member suggested that security would be increased if the house was occupied on a full-time basis.

Missing sign a sign of the times

ON my leisurely stroll past the front entrance of the building above the playing field, 1 notice that the wording Falkland Islands Community School has been removed.

I presume this is for purposes of maintenance, rather than an attempt to change the name of the school by default.

The name given to the school was a matter of intense debate at the time when the building was first proposed and the expenditure of three years capital projects was in the budget.

It was agreed that the name should cater for the whole country, and not just the residents of Stanley, and that it should reflect the all-encompassing nature of the role within the community. Hence the full title of Falkland Islands Community School.

The tille has suffered the shortening to FICS in official statements, debates, adverts and general references to the building. Not as a compliment to the pronouncement of the individual letters F. I. C. S, but in the revised derivative "Fix".

I would suggest that this dubbing down of the name undermines the spirit and purpose of the establishment.

The school was designed and built to serve the education and training needs of the whole community.

The vision was that it should be open and used by all sectors of society for an equal amount of contact time as the legal requirement to provide full time education for students (not kids) aged 11 through to 16.

Community use did include adult evening classes, seminars, workshops, exhibitions, literacy and numeracy sessions, community lectures, apprentice and trainee classes, and afterschool provision for skills upgrades and homework.

The ethos of the school was to cater, as far as possible, for the individual needs of the students.

Inferences gained from jargon used to clarify GCSE results does not reflect the achievements of students and teachers in pursuing this aim. The need to justify performance by comparison to UK schools is unnecessary and misleading.

The question should be: "Is the school providing the education



that best suits the needs of the student and the Falkland Islands?"

One way to assess this is by results obtained by taking internationally recognised examinations, which can lead onto further study.

However, there are many other indicators that could be used, and should be trumpeted by the Education Department Management Team.

Unfortunately, it is hard to take any statement of achievement seriously, when it is prefaced by the acronym FICS.

I would be interested to know if in that convoluted flight we counted as two passengers or four. When we left Carcass and went to Saunders a fellow guest from Carcass was going to Sea Lion Island.

After we left the plane at Saunders he was the only passenger, and the plane was scheduled to take him to Stanley, then take him, again as a solo passenger, to Sea Lion, where he got off and two passengers got on to return to Stanley. I believe for that he would be charged for two flights.

The time has surely come for council to take immediate action.

Indeed I would beg you to, before we lose good, experienced local pilots. This mess is not of their making.

The goodwill in Camp towards the Air Service management has evaporated leaving something approaching fury and contempt, even from the mildest of people.



Dr Barry Elsby, along with KEMH theatre technicians Eric Black and David Ashbridge, joined forces with veterinary department staff to help diagnose a little dog's illness.

The KEMH had donated their outdated endoscope and accessories to the Veterinary Service when the antiquated equipment was replaced with a newer model.

Veterinary surgeon Zoe Luxton said while her department had some modern equipment such as the dental and anaesthetic machine, they had never had an endoscope.

She said the old hospital equipment was still new technology to them and some assistance was needed in using it properly.

"Rikki, the little dog we used it on, has been very unwell with a gastrointestinal problem for quite some time," said Zoe. "Having the equipment to easily examine his stomach and intestines without major invasive surgery was a huge benefit."

The combined team were also able to get some biopsies, which will hopefully help with further diagnoses and treatment of the dog.

Veteran goes back to fight another day

A FALKLANDS veteran has come out of retirement to fly helicopters in Afghanistan.

Lieutenant Commander Bill O'Brien (54), a Royal Navy Reservist, has volunteered for a tour with 633 Squadron Army Air Corps, flying an Apache attack helicopter.

The father of three retired from active service in 2005, having originally joined the Royal Marines in 1971.

Although there are some 600 reservists from all three services in Afghanistan, Lt Cmdr O'Brien is the only one currently piloting a helicopter.

The Apache had not been deployed when Lt Cmdr O'Brien retired so there was "an itch yet to scratch," he said. "I believe I have a

contribution to make. There is still some life in the old dog."

With more than 30 years of air experience, Lt Cmdr O'Brien was awarded the Distinguished Flying Medal while flying a Gazelle at the battles of Darwin and Goose Green in the 1982 Falklands conflict. His work in Operation Corporate involved rescuing casualties and delivering supplies.

More power to the people

WIND generated power in the Camp has provided 24-hour power for farms as well as making fuel savings of up to £2,000 per year, according to a Development Corporation survey.

General Manager David Waugh said 51 positive responses were received, although some common problems relating to maintenance and repairs had been highlighted.

"The overriding initial picture is that people are very pleased to be saving quite a lot of fuel. It is hoped to gain a more accurate quantitive assessment, but many are quoting savings of over £2,000 per year and getting 24 hour power."

He said there was no funding for maintenance or replacement.

Argos donation a 'massive boost' for breast screening campaign

A GENEROUS donation from local fishing company Argos has helped ensure the Falklands breast screening campaign gets underway towards the end of February.

Receiving the cheque with fellow trustee Theresa Lang, Mr Brownlee said fundraising and private sector donations now made up more than half of the funding required for the breast screening to take place with mobile equipment and technicians from Chile.

Sunny, dry September

SEPTEMBER had average temperatures, below average rainfall for the month and above average sunshine.

The mean maximum temperature was 8 celsius, which is above the long-term average for September of 7.6c. The highest temperature recorded was 16.2c on the 29th.

The lowest maximum was 0.8c on the 21st. The mean minimum temperature was 1.1c. which is just above the 1c September average. The lowest minimum was -3.1c on the 27th, and the highest minimum was 8c recorded on the 21st.

The total rainfall for the month was 29mm, which is below the average 33mm for September. The wettest day was the 20th with a total of 9.3mm.

There was 151.1 hours of sunshine, which is above the monthly average of 131.5 hours.

There were 11 days when sleet or snow fell and seven days when snow was reported lying. There were no days of thunder. There were two days with fog, and hail fell on eight days, above the normal of six days.

The monthly mean wind speed was 14.6 knots, which is below the average for September of 15.3 knots. The highest hourly mean speed of 35 knots occurred on the 23rd as did the highest recorded gust of 51 knots.

There were 13 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots, which is below average of 16.4 knots for the month. Three gale days were recorded, which is average for the month.

Three billion barrels of oil says Desire

DESIRE Petroleum prospective un-risked recoverable resources in Falkland Islands' waters are over three billion barrels of oil within the company's ten top prospects, according to the recently completed Competent Person's Report (CPR) released this week.

At USS50 a barrel, the minimum economic threshold can be estimated in a 56 million barrel recoverable field, said the report.

Desire has focused its exploration efforts in the North Falkland Basin, and commissioned a CPR from the UK company Senergy Limited. Senergy is considered a major independent consultancy specialising in reservoir engineering, geology, geophysics and petroleum economics.

The company evaluated Desire's top ten prospects; namely the Liz, Ann. Alpha, Dawn, Jacinta, Beth, Ninky, Rachel, Helen and Pam prospects. The mean gross un-risked prospective recoverable resources in these ten prospects is reported to be more than 4.6 billion barrels.

"It is particularly pleasing to have our own work on the prospectivity of the North Falklands Basin, and of our own prospects, endorsed by a well respected independent energy consultant, said Stephen Phipps. Chairman of Desire, commenting on the CPR results.

"We look forward with great excitement to the forthcoming drilling campaign"





Last soldier honoured

THE parents of the last British soldier to be killed in the Falklands War have had their son's name placed alongside those of the fallen in the two World Wars in a Northamptonshire church more than 27 years after he died.

Craig Jones aged 20 of the 3rd Parachute Regiment was hit by shrapnel just before British troops entered stanley.

His family had prepared a welcome home party after hearing of the Argentine surrender only to find afterwards he had died in the war's final minutes

A decision about how to honour him in Greens Norton where he lived for 12 months was not taken by the Royal British Legion at the time and the issue gradually became forgotten

But the present branch recently applied for money from the war memorials trust and combined it with cash from county councillor Ben Smith's empowering councillor fund to buy a plaque.

On Monday the family who described their emotions as still raw were joined by Craig's former red devil comrades at Green Norton's church to see it.

She told of a 1940s wardrobe the shop had recently received. with poor quality wood and a missing handle.

"It's functional." said Ann. "It's got the doors, it closes." And she said it would help somebody in an emergency, or someone starting out in life with very little.

she said.

Their biggest seller is clothing, especially children's clothing. "They grow out of them so quickly," said Ann.

Books and crockery are also popular items which move rapidly through the shop.

Ian carried out the initial design of the book and "passed it over" to his daughter to complete.


"We put the whole thing together between us," said Georgina. "He has quite a bit of experience publishing books, so I learned a lot from him."

Ian Strange was born in Lincolnshire and first came to the Falkland Islands in 1959.

"It is somewhere seemingly so inaccessible to most people, so it was really good to get there," she said.


"That was definitely a super highlight, just a completely stunning place."





Half the population to decide our future

THE next 19 days will determine the winners and losers in the Falklands General Election – and the path of the government for the next four years.

A little over half of the population is entitled to vote. A total of 1,584 people were registered on the electoral roll when it was updated yesterday: 1,322 for Stanley and 262 for Camp.

After nominations closed last night, 18 of those were confirmed as candidates for the eight positions in the Legislative Assembly – five representing Stanley and three representing Camp. Two

councillors have stood down: Richard Cockwell for Stanley and Mike Rendell for Camp. The remaining six are standing again. Election day is Thursday No-

vember 5, and the count will take place in the Town Hall, Stanley, immediately after the final booths close at 6pm.

The Penguin News will be providing more in-depth coverage of this election than it has in previous polls.

In addition to publishing a manifesto article, we will be asking prospective councillors to respond to three key questions:

* Health and education: how would you deliver smarter outcomes?

* Camp and Stanley: what is required to achieve a better balance?

* Elevating issues: what areas of Falklands life deserve more attention?

All articles, including the mani-festo, will be up to 200 words.

Letters were last night sent to candidates outlining deadlines and other requirements. Their responses will be published in the Penguin News on October 23 and October 30.

Members of the public will have the opportunity to attend a press conference with candidates at the Town Hall on Monday October 26, and a public meeting on Tuesday November 3. FIRS is hoping to broadcast both the next day.

The Chamber of Commerce will also be inviting candidates to two meetings for Chamber members, which they hope to televise on KTV

WHEN I was in my teens, I remember going on a day trip to Blackpool. The car in front of mine hit an unfortunate straggler crossing the promenade.

He spun off the bonnet, and I saw someone suddenly become lifeless in front of me.

Some years later, in former West Germany, I visited one of the concentration camps.

The gas chambers had been razed to the ground, and huge stone tablets had been mounted into the sides of enormous, carefully manicured grassy mounds. On the side of one of them was written: "Here lies 20,000 dead."

Five years ago I was closest to a dead person than I had ever been. The frame was familiar, but the spirit had gone somewhere else.

The body had belonged to my dad. He just didn't own it anymore.

Earlier this year, a good colleague of mine suddenly stopped sending me emails. I discovered he had died while overseas. For some months afterwards, his ghostly image occasionally

appeared on my laptop. Noone had switched off his Facebook account, and a dead person

was still inviting me to become his friend.

Most of us are exposed to death, and its aftermath, in many ways. Over the past two weekends, 353 people visited this country to acknowledge the deaths of their loved ones.

Irrespective of their origins, their beliefs, the colour of their skin or the cause for which they were fighting when they died, I wanted to pay my respects to the innocent families they had left behind.

All families of war dead must bear the burden for the rest of their lives. And these families were no different to any others who have no choice but to suffer in such a way.

When I briefly met Olga Suarez and Rodolfo Muller at Darwin on Saturday they, like the remaining next of kin, were simply ordinary people who had suffered extraordinary loss.

What made this pilgrimage so poignant for them was the 27 years they had waited for this opportunity.

The legacy of the Falklands War, like any other, is that grief knows no boundaries, and no national borders.

Just ask the families of those who died fighting Olga's husband and Rodolfo's brother.

Ultimately, they share the same pain.

Falklands still a major issue for most Argentines

EIGHT out of ten Argentines believe the British presence in the Falkland Islands is a violation of Argentine sovercignty, according to a poll published this week.

But a significant percentage is willing to consider the possibility of shared sovereignty.

The poll was conducted in and around Buenos Aires, taking advantage of the high level of media coverage of the Argentine next of kin visits to gauge views on the situation between Britain and Argentina over the Falklands.

More than half of those surveyed openly disagree with the military occupation of 1982, although 79.3% consider the Falklands to be a "pretty important" or "very important" issue for the country.

A significant number of young people consider the issue important, indicating that the question of sovereignty is not likely to disappear for some time.

The survey also revealed that diplomacy was the preferred tool to recover sovereignty over the Falklands and any war-like action was strongly rejected. In effect, seven out of ten support Argentina's diplomatic actions in international and regional forums, while 11.8% prefer political and economic pressure to force Britain to negotiate sovereignty. Only 3.2% remain supportive of a military occupation of the Islands.

Just over half of those interviewed (52.8%) said they openly disagreed with the military recovery of the Falklands in 1982, while 44.3% support the Argentine government's sovereignty claims in international forums.

Three out of ten Argentines think in the future the UK and Argentina will share sovereignty over the Islands, while 25% believe

that eventually the Falklands will return to Argentina. Only 15.9% think the Falklands will become an independent country.

As to shared sovereignty, 41% consider it a step towards complete Argentine sovereignty while 30% say it is "unacceptable," and 18.9% say it's the maximum Argentina "will ever be able to achieve".

"If the some degree of shared sovereignty' tendency is confirmed, this could give future Argentine governments a negotiation point which has not been explored since the end of the South Atlantic war in 1982," said Leonardo Hekimian, Foreign Policy Professor at the Catholic University of Argentina.

Regarding the recent trips to the Falklands of the Argentine next of kin, 80% were aware of the visits and almost 40% say the trips ratify the Falklands as a national cause. Another 36.8% argue the visits contribute to reaffirming Argentina's presence in the Islands, while 22.1% believe they only have a meaning for the next of kin.

Four in ten consider the inauguration of the Argentine Memorial at Darwin to be an achievement for the Argentine government, while 34.3% do not think this was the case.

Para medic shares Ajax Bay memories

FALKLANDS veteran Mike "Fritz" Sterba witnessed more horror than most as a member of the parachute regiment surgical team at Ajax Bay. On Wednesday he shared his experiences during a lecture at Liberty Lodge. Ailie Biggs reports...

A SUFFERER of post traumatic stress disorder, Fritz was candid and honest during his presentation this week, holding his audience spellbound for several hours.

As a Warrant Officer with the surgical team supporting the parachute regiment, Fritz left for the Falklands from Portsmouth.

"People were cheering and waving," he said. "It was grand. Something of a holiday mood."

But this was very different to his feelings upon returning to the UK after the conflict.

Fritz disembarked from the HMS Norland to Ajax Bay in May 1982, where he took up his duties. Within hours, they were receiving streams of casualties, working in two teams, day on, day off at first.

When the fighting intensified, and the casualties increased, they all worked solidly, for up to three days at a time: "After three days it gets dangerous, you start making mistakes," he said.

He described the bombing of Ajax Bay by Argentine pilots on May 27: "They got through and dropped four five thousand pounders on us," he said. The first hit the end of the

The first hit the end of the building, killing five men. One bomb entered and exited the building without exploding while two rested unexploded.

At the time Fritz was working on Argentine casualties. The building was on fire, and ammunition started exploding.

"After all of this, the guys were still in there operating on people," he said.

Then one of the Argentine pilots was brought in to be treated: "I couldn't feel any liking for him, but I admired his professionalism. He had a wife and kids as well, just like me."

The Geneva Convention says all injured combatants must be treated, irrespective of which side of the battle they were fighting: "You have to maintain that stand-

ard of care, because that's all important," said Fritz. "When you lose that, you lose everything. That's when you get your humanity failing."

With British troops advancing on Goose Green, Defence Minister John Knott's premature announcement on the BBC that the attack was under way, removing the element of surprise and forewarning the Argentine forces, is an element of the conflict which still leaves Fritz angry.

"I still feel very, very bitter about that. I see old men, politicians and diplomats making mistakes, and young men having to go and sort out their mistakes, and lay down their lives."

When the battle moved closer to Stanley, Fritz was transferred to Teal Inlet on board the Sir Lancelot, arriving in the dark on June 2. The casualties kept coming in and would arrive by tractor and trailer loads at a time, and always in the dark.

Fritz didn't properly meet the tractor driver until 2002. Islander Neil Rowlands was just 15 years old, but he had driven between the tront line and the medical unit to get the casualties the treatment they needed.

"The people that are driving the evacuation are the people that save the lives," Fritz said. "I can't stress the importance enough."

Once the Argentine forces had surrendered, Fritz was moved to Stanley.

He said he believed it was important to fit together "all the different pieces of the puzzle" on what had happened during his time in the Faiklands, and that talking to others about their experiences was vital for everyone who suffered, and still suffered. "Noone can be completely prepared for war," he said.

"There are some things for which there is no rehearsal, no training. To see them going into the trenches, I won't forget it."

On his return to the UK after the war, the crowds were once again cheering, this time for the returning troops.

But rather than the holiday feeling he had experienced before, this was hard for Fritz. "You don't really want that," he said. "There's things you don't want to cheer about. You've left so many boys behind, you just want to see your family.

"Sometimes the transition from war to being normal is hard."

Fritz was diagnosed with post traumatic stress disorder in 1999, after a breakdown while working on his fruit farm, and years of suffering.

His initial reaction was to say: "No, I'm bullet proof, that doesn't happen to me."

He described a picture he had once seen as an example of the effect war can have years later: "It was a picture of me looking at a line of body bags. It just brought me right back there. It's something that will never leave me."

Fritz has been helped immensely by his trips to the Falklands, describing the experience as cathartic.

This is the third time he has visited, and the first with his wife Christine. He said the real joy for a veteran was returning and seeing everything that had been achieved by the people who lived here.

"We are very grateful to everyone, for all your help and care," he told his audience.

Fritz leaves the Falklands today after his 10 day visit.

Dead end road

WITH machinery on site and ready to start work, the Onion Range road project has ground to a halt as the Ministry of Defence (MoD) and landowners try to come to an agreement on contract details. FIG have been contracted by the MoD to build the road to the range through privately owned land. The Roads Engineer confirmed all works had ceased on the road to the Onion Range for the time being, but did not wish to comment further.

Kent car crash

EMERGENCY services attended a vehicle accident on the Mount Kent road on Sunday. Driver Andrew Lee and five passengers were returning from a drive to Teal Inlet at approximately 5.30pm. The passengers received minor injuries. Mr Lee dislocated his shoulder and broke his arm, and his wife Belen Lee broke her shoulder.

Brits bottom

DESPITE having the highest incomes, people in Britain have the worst quality of life in Europe, according to the uSwitch.com Quality of Life Index. Britons have longer working hours, lower holiday entitlement and a higher cost of living, placing them at the bottom of the list in the survey. The French and Spanish, who retire earlier and live longer, came out on top of the list.

TWO acts of criminal damage were reported to police over the weekend. Sergeant Dave Roberts said a window was broken at a property on Fitzroy Road on Saturday, and the rear window of a vehicle was smashed on John Street early on Sunday morning. Its lights were also damaged. Police would be grateful for any information relating to the two incidents.

Yes minister

MINISTER for Overseas Territories Chris Bryant has been appointed new Minister for Europe, in a Foreign Office reshuffle. He replaces Baroness Glenys Kinnock who has been handed responsibility for Africa. Mr Bryant remains Minister for the Overseas Territories.

SAMA visit

THE annual veteran's pilgrimage, organised by SAMA FI is to take place next month. Chairman of SAMA FI Gary Clement said although it was not a large group travelling to the islands, they were still in need of drivers to assist during their visit.

Focus on health for new director

WHEN the new Director of Health and Education takes up his post he will primarily concentrate on the health aspect of the job.

David Jenkins is due to arrive in January.

Director of Health and Social Services, Derek Muhl told the Health and Medical Services committee meeting earlier this week: "The focus has to be on health, initially.

He said: "The reality is, because Richard Fogerty [Director of Education] is in post when the new corporate director comes, the focus on the person who comes, is going to be on health.

Partly because there are a number of issues surrounding health spending, as to a large extent it's unplanned."

He added that there was a need for tighter control over the health and social services than there had been previously

Mr Jenkins is soon to leave the British Army

Mr Muhl said he was very keen to come to the Islands, and may considering visiting in December.

Court speeding

UK company wins demining contract

THE Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) has announced that Battle Area Clearance and Training Equipment Consultants Inter-national Ltd (BACTEC) has been chosen to carry out the Falkland Islands demining project

A Government House spokesperson said the Rochester-based British company was selected after a "rigorous procurement process which included three other strong bidders."

BACTEC has experience of working in more than 40 countries and has a strong track record in safety

BACTEC's management team, Project Manager Roger Gagen and his Operating Manager Kevin Bryant, have both served in the Falkland Islands as part of the Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) detachment and will run the project from offices in Stanley

The contract was signed on October 9 at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office

BACTEC's team is expected to arrive in late October. Clearance of four sites at Surf Bay, Sapper Hill, Goose Green and Fox Bay (East) is likely to start in November and conclude by the end of the austral summer

Their team of 36 Zimbabwean deminers has worked for BACTEC on a number of mine clearance projects, most recently in Lebanon.

Various jobs in support of the project will be advertised locally. Both BACTEC and the Demining Project Office (DPO), already established at Ten Acres, will rely on the support of local companies for accommodation and supplies.

Clearance of mines from 117 mined areas was to have finished by March this year but Britain secured a 10-year extension for the project, arguing the task was too challenging to be completed within the timeframe.

BACTEC says that in the pe-riod since 1991 it has cleared more than 500,000 landmines and thousands of tons of unexploded ordnance, and cleared or verified in excess of eight million square metres of ordnance-containinated land in 40 countries.

The DPO will exercise quality control over BACTEC's demining activities to ensure that they meet the standards required and welcome enquiries from the public.

Punta strike may affect **Islands trade**

FREIGHT deliveries to the Falklands from Punta Arenas could be at risk if a strike by protesting truck drivers continues for another week.

Striking drivers have cut off road links to the port as their union lobbies Chilean congress for funds to help subsidise land transport to remote areas, and to reduce costly Customs and traffic paperwork.

Industrial action stepped up a gear early this week, but by then the latest fortnightly shipment to the Falklands was already in the dock at Punta Arenas, and in the process of being loaded for delivery to FIPASS

Tim Miller of Stanley Growers said the strike should have no immediate effect on supplies to the Falklands.

But he added: "If it is still going on in a week's time that would be getting a bit worrying."

Food and tuel supplies in Punta Arenas are running low while the union waits for a delegation from Santiago to arrive for help with negotiations.

Patient referrals within budget

DIRECTOR of Health and Social Services, Derek Muhl. said the government budget on overseas referrals was "fine for now" in the Health and Medical Services Committee meeting, held on October 8

He said: "So far this year, from July 1, the spend is in line with our expectations, in that we haven't spent more than the money allocated in our budget."

Mr Muhl said last year was bad in financial terms, in that a lot of people were sent away for medical treatment.

Mr Muhl said: "The demand for treatment does fluctuate up and down '



Prisons improved but more work needed for inmates

MAKING his second visit this year the Southern Oceans Prison Advisor has said prison conditions in Stanley are better and more secure but there is a lack of work for prisoners

A former deputy governor of Strangeways and governor of Wormwood Scrubs, Keith Munns has clocked up 42 years in the prison service.

In his present position he is contracted to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and advises on prison conditions in the Falklands as well as other British territories in the Southern hemisphere.

Mr Munns will write his report within a month for the Gover-

nor of the Falklands and the FCO, making comment and recommendations

"There is always something that can be done better, but it al-ways costs money," he said.

He last visited in January when the Royal Falkland Islands Police



Station and prison were undergoing an extensive renovation and rebuild

"The conditions then were awful for prisoners and staff alike," said Mr Munns.

He was due to return in July but a delay in the airbridge flight meant that he had to cancel the visit. Now the whole environment is more professional and the organisation more efficient, he told the Penguin News.

But he said prisoners needed more work that could be carried out within the prison.

Mr Munns does not subscribe to the idea that conditions in prison are too soft nowadays

People should think of how they would like a family member to be treated," he said, adding that best efforts should be made to see that prisoners do not reoffend.

While he appreciated there was not a lot of industry in the Islands he asked that people consider work that could be

carried out in a secure environment for prisoners who are not of a suitable category to go out into the community, particularly when there is a shortage of staff for escort. "Education and work are an important part of rehabilitation, he said.

Rare Penguin Ale wings its way to Glasgow landlords collection

FIVE months of enquiries and a notice in the Penguin News has resulted in some rare "homebrewed" ale being exported from the Falklands.

Darren 'Daz' Ives, who has just left the Islands, was in the Falklands with the Naval Support Cell and had been asked by a landlord friend in Glasgow to take home a Falklands-brewed beer bottle for his collection.

Not a problem you would think, However, production of the only ale commercially brewed in the Falklands ground to a halt more than 25 years ago.

Everards Penguin Ale was pro-

duced in Stanley from 1983 until 1986, in a move by Everards to supply the military forces stationed in the Islands after the 1982 war with some much-needed home comforts.

But the ale produced by the micro-brewery, situated near what is now the Capstan Gift Shop, wasn't quite to the taste

of the forces, who were accustomed to the draught ale and beer served up in British pubs, while the locals were firmly attached to their imported McEwans ale and

Tennents lager. While Darren's search kept coming to a dead end a message he placed in Penguin News soon produced results. Carrie Decroliere from Fox Bay got in touch and had some key rings with the Penguin Ale logo which she kindly gave to him - but, no bottles. Meanwhile in Stanley Ian Bury remembered he had been cutting up some old ISO containers many years ago and found some Penguin Ale bottles - more testament to the taste that the bottles were still full. Darren met up with Ian who gave him two bottles in the original cardboard display case, in exchange for some wine and lager.

Time is right for public transport

THERE has been much debate about the parking arrangements at or around the Junior School recently and noone seems to have the ultimate answer to the problem.


Maybe we should be looking at just why this problem has escalated.

Many years ago when Stanley was a mere couple of square miles in area. very few people had or needed transport and could easily get to and from work in time for their lunch or whatever. Children needed little or no escorting in those days. However, over time the town population has develthe town population has developed rapidly and where once just 50 primary children went to school we now have around 300 and growing.

To add to this more people now drive to work because the town now extends for many miles and it is impossible to walk to and from the work-place and have sufficient time to have your meal. Both parents are now working dual roles to survive financially and timing is very important to them. Transport has become their lifeline.

The Junior School soon became





too small to cater for the fast growing population of children and the government and councillors at the time, in spite of concerns from a lot of people, went ahead and expanded what was an already tiny site. They even removed the old Defence Force club to get extra room.

At the end of the day the planners got it all wrong because they assumed the now recently expanded police station would be resited to the outskirts of town, and the space for parking was lost.

To further add to the problem government allowed residents to develop new properties in their back yards, resulting in many more people with a second or third vehicle having no additional parking space, so leaving them on the roads. John Street is a classic example of over fill.

The other major mistake that happened was the decision not to build a new junior school near the Community School at the time.

One day someone will wake up and realise that we do have thousands of unused acres of land that could be developed and stop crowding an already over-crowded town. Even the PWD is struggling to maintain sewers and water systems that were never designed to carry this extra volume.

To assist the children and the frustrated parents to safely get their children to and from school, we should in the interim re-introduce the school bus service.

This could be easily achieved by designating pick-up and dropoff points for children to be delivered to and collected from. The other alternative would be to revert to the good old days when lunch was an hour and a half for the work-force so giving people time to walk.

Stanley has evolved into a very industrious city and maybe the time is right for the introduction of a public transport system which would remove a lot of the vehicles otherwise parked during work.

Maybe FIG could introduce a government employee bus system. The costs to run would more than be recovered by the reduction of traffic left parked on road-sides.

Families pay their respects, to their loved ones and their hosts

WE spoke for only a couple of minutes. Yet before we had exchanged even a single word, she had held my hand tightly and kissed me on the check.

I have no idea why she approached me. All I could tell was that she just wanted to hug one of us. It didn't really matter who. She simply wanted to say thank you.

Her name was Olga Suarez, and she was visiting the Argentine memorial at Darwin to commemorate the life of her husband Juan, one of the 323 killed in the sinking of the General Belgrano.

It was on that day, at the age of 18, she became a widow.

His grave wasn't there: just his name etched in the wall which arcs around the cemetery. But it was a pilgrimage she had to make.

"I came to pay my deep respects to my husband and those who fell," she told me.

"I shall go with much emotion, but with a lot of fulfilment and satisfaction. Thank you so very much."

She would have spoken for longer, had she not needed to meet the bus which would take her and the remaining 182 next of kin on the first leg of their journey home, less than four hours after they had

arrived. It was in those brief but moving moments, after the memorial inauguration ceremony, when many of the relatives seemed to be at peace. Or at least content they had paid their respects, most for the first time since the conflict.

Rodolfo Muller was weeping by the memorial wall when I first saw him. It was the closest he could get to his brother Rene, an

18-year-old who also died on the Belgrano.

He too grasped my hand. I pointed to the poppy I was wearing, and he offered me the best smile he could.

"It is really important for me to be here to commemorate my brother," said Rodolfo. "To come here has been a big release."

He didn't want to say too much else. But, like Olga, he was eager

to thank those people around him who were looking on.

"I am really grateful for everybody supporting this," he said. "I am very grateful for all the people who have helped."

Their gratitude was not only genuine, it was palpable. As they headed back to the buses, some of them just grabbed a stranger to hug. And they revealed below their tears some of the warmest of smiles a person could offer to someone they did not know.

On this day, for people like Olga and Rodolfo, the process of healing had leapt forward 27 years.

Father Peter Norris, of St Mary's in Stanley. had shared the concelebration service with an Argentine bishop and padre, after an image of Argentina's patron saint, Our Lady of Lujan, was carried in procession to take its place in a shrine as part of the memorial wall.

"The intensity of the emotion was quite something," he said afterwards.

"I was absolutely amazed, to be honest, at the intense gratitude they showed for being allowed to be here. At one point I felt very close to tears. You had to be there."

Reflecting on a poignant moment and the pain of war

FATHER Peter Norris was serving in the Navy at the time of the conflict, and met one of the next of kin who showed him a picture of her father.

"He was in service uniform," said Father Peter. "I asked if he was on the Belgrano and she said yes. I know one or two of the guys who were on the Conqueror, the sub that sank the Belgrano. "It was a very moving mo-

"It was a very moving moment, to be talking to a woman whose father would have been with her if it hadn't been for my mates. It was very poignant."

He said while relations between opposing militia could heal over time, coping with the aftermath of war was difficult for some Islanders.

"The British military actually get on with the Argentine veterans. They understand they were doing a job. It wasn't a personal vendetta.

"But it is more difficult for the civilians," he said. "For those who were here at the time it is difficult to forget when you had bombs dropping around you. It's a type of post traumatic stress for some civilians.

"They didn't expect it, and they didn't go looking for it. It just happened to them." But he believed most Islanders accepted the visits in good grace: "These relatives are not worried about politics, they just want closure," he said.

"A majority of people in the Islands don't begrudge them coming here to do that."

Black Buck vets Thunderstruck

TWO Falklands veterans will be taking part in the Yorkshire Air Museum Thunder Day on Sunday, when a Handley Page Victor V – Bomber / K2 Tanker XL231, affectionately known as Lusty Lindy, takes to the skies.

Lusty Lindy was used as a refuelling tanker for the Vulcan bombers that made five Black Buck bombing raids during the 1982 war.

The raids forced the Argentine Air Force to withdraw their Mirage II fighters to defend from the mainland, instead of engaging the Royal Navy and RAF Sea Harriers over the Falklands.

The aircraft will be started up close to the crowd line and will conduct a circuit around the dispersal area before lining up for a thunderous blast from the four mighty Rolls Royce Cay engines that will propel it down Elvington's long runway.

The Victor, under the control of Falklands War veteran Barry Neale, will deploy its parachute to slow it down and the inboard engines will keep the parachute inflated as the Victor taxis back, offering a great photographic spectacle.

Barry, who lectures on the Black Buck raids, which were at the time the longest range bombing mission undertaken by any air force, piloted the tanker which refuelled the aircraft that dropped the bombs on Stanley airport during the war in 1982.

He was also involved in the strategic planning of the Black Buck raids.



West Store seeks stock ideas from customers

THE West Store extension is due to be completed next month and the manager wants to ensure the extra shelf space is packed with products specifically requested by customers.

Manager Paul Lewis said he wanted customers to let him know of any products the shelves may be currently missing.

"Anything that people want, we've now got the space so we can stock it." he said.

The retail space will be increased by approximately 30 per cent, and staff at the West Store are trying to guess what people want to fill the extra shelves.

"But if people let us know what they want, we can order it, and everyone wins," Mr Lewis said.

"There are flyers in the West Store, or alternatively ring the office and let them know of your preference, from hair products to brands of pasta sauce."

An electrical store will be opened upstairs, with "a massive range of DVDs and CDs, TVs, computers, I-pods," Mr Lewis said. "Anything electrical is going to be up there."

He apologised to customers for moving items around, and explained it was necessary in order to keep the store open during the refurbishment.

Missile men on the road to Stanley





From September 28 to October 2 the children learned about the food, culture and language of Spain, Italy, Hungary and England, and held a carnival on Friday, where they visited European themed classrooms with colourful passports.

Every year group selected a country: Year 6 and Foundation Stage 1 chose England, with flags, castles and tea and scones; Year 5 and Foundation Stage 2 studied Italy, where ice cream was made and devoured, t-shirts in the style of famous designers were created, and Roman mosaic artwork was attempted; Years 4 and 2 chose Hungary with goulash and artwork; Years 1 and 3 selected Spain. recreating masterpieces by Picasso, Dali and Miro.

Asking students which country they enjoyed the most received a varied response. Elanis Sanchez (8) said her favourite part of the week was eating goulash: "It was so delicious. Doing Hungary was the best because we got to make moon biscuits - you get to dip into chocolate and lots of people got to make other sweets, and most of all I really like goulash." Dwight Joshua (8) said he thought the goulash was too spicy: "Vis-

The Falklands is the first British Overseas Territory to receive funding from the Comenius programme, and this week for the first time, welcomed guests from the schools within their consortium

Teacher Jackie Adams said 18,000 over two years from the British Council from the EU had been received, which had paid for teaching staff to visit Spain and Hungary, and to visit Turin in Italy early next year: "The money has aided curriculum development," she said.

We've been impressed by how warm and friendly the people have been, everyone we have met has been wonderful." Her opinion was echoed by Mrs Pinteno: "I feel like I have been here for ages. I feel at home. The people are so friendly, I don't think anyone has felt anything but welcome."

The consortium have entitled their group project "My Story, Your Story, Our Story," which involves all of those participating sharing folk tales to educate students and teachers in different countries. The Falklands story is that of Fred

The visiting teachers are Newman who, along with his son, survived being swept out to sea in his boat all of the way to Argentina, a tale of survival against the odds.

Foundation Stage I gave an impromptu and fascinating re-enactment of an Italian tale, with a troublesome dragon and a drunken bull.

After touring the school, the group visited many locations including Gypsy Cove. North Arm, New Haven, San Carlos, Race Point and Teal Inlet (Fred's original home), undertaking a number of activities such as visiting Camp schools and travelling teachers, and viewing wildlife. They also studied a number of local crafts, such as spinning and felting.

The Comenius programme focuses on the first phase of education, from pre-school up until secondary school. It aims to develop knowledge and understanding among young people and educational staff on the diversity of European cultures, languages and values.

John Amos Comenius (1592-1670) was a Czech teacher, scientist, educator and writer, who was one of the earliest champions of universal education. He became known as the teacher of nations, and is often considered the father of modern education.







Q WITH elections coming up, is there a restriction on the number of periods of office councillors can hold, and if not, why not?

The answer to this, and the following question was provided by Government Chief Executive Tim Thorogood.

A No, there are no restrictions. The qualifications for election are set down in Section 28 of the Constitution and so any proposal to introduce restrictions on the number of periods someone could hold office would require Constitutional change.

Q HOW can FIG not allow a small amount to be spent on mobile polling stations on both East and West Falkland at the forthcoming General Election?

A During the General Election in November 2009. polling stations arrangements for East and West Falkland and islands are set out in the following paragraph:

For East Falkland there will be all-day polling stations at Town Hall, Stanley, from 1000 hours to 1800 hours and Goose Green from 0900 hours to 1600 hours will be available. Only one mobile polling station will be available on East Falkland. This will be at Hope Cottage from 1000 hours to 1200 hours on polling day.

On West Falkland, Fox Bay will be open on polling day from 0900 hours to 1600 hours. Two mobile polling stations will be available on the Tuesday prior to polling day and will visit Hill Cove from 0900 hours to 1100 hours and then Port Howard from 1400 hours to 1600 hours. These will be the only mobile polling stations available.

East and West Falkland islands will not have mobile polling stations but have the options of using either postal/proxy or postal proxy voting.

These options are also available to any voter who may wish to take out a postal/proxy or postal proxy vote. All timings will be placed over the radio and in the Penguin News nearer the time, and all timings for this election will be Stanley local time.

Q HOW many people are employed at FIDC?

Q WHAT are their job titles and what does each of their jobs entail?

A FIDC staff work includes participation in the development of the RDS. TDS and EDS: the shipping consolidation service; coastal shipping; project delivery; rural energy grants; tourism grants; loan application processing; loans management: project and business analysis: business advice; FIMCo - corporate, livestock supply and livestock transportation; FIMCo Review; Asset Management - including Stanley Dairy, Stanley Growers land, Lookout Industrial Estate, Gordon Lines, etc; developing strategies/policies for FIG: new business research; European funding: new and major projects; finance and bookkeeping, corporate administration; etc.

Under the terms of the 1983 Ordinance establishing the Corporation, the functions of FIDC are (somewhat paraphrased):

- to encourage and assist the economic development of the Islands; - to advise FIG on the development of all sectors of business; - to advise FIG on rural development;

- to advise FIG on government expenditure in agriculture;

- to advise FIG on other matters relating to the economic development of the Falkland Islands as both may see fit;

- to examine and advise upon proposals referred to FIDC by ExCo relating to the imposition or revision of tariffs, quotas, taxes, duties or other protective or developmental measures.

WHAT is the total annual salary paid to all FIDC employecs?

A The total annual salaries paid to FIDC employees, including aquaculture, in 2008/09 was £304.270.

Q WHAT was the total amount of money allocated to assist small businesses during last year?

A The total spend on assisting small businesses in the Falkland Islands, including grants, loans, staff/business advisors and specific projects, amounted to approximately £525,000 in 2008/09.





'No threat' to airbridge as **AIG economy nosedives**

MoD tax dispute at the heart of Ascension row

A DISPUTE between the Ministry of Defence and Ascension Island Government is threatening the future of the island's economy.

If the row is not resolved in the coming months, the British overseas territory - which links the Falklands to the UK via the airbridge - would effectively become bankrupt.

However, the MoD says the airbridge is not at risk

The row centres on less than £1 million in unpaid taxes on the MoD's RAF airbase, and the AIG budget is going into a tailspin as a result

Government administrator Ross Denny yesterday admitted the Island's economy was at a 'critical point.'

He told the Penguin News: "We have some reserves left, but we anticipate they will be exhausted by the middle of next

year. "We certainly face some major challenges. In the meantime we are realising as much savings as we can to mitigate the problem."

The council and government, responsible for all services to the 900 inhabitants, have reportedly "cut spending to the bone."

A review of taxes was also imminent, said Mr Denny.

The outstanding tax bill relates to the value of MoD assets on the Island, calculated when property tax was introduced in 2002

"It is a long and complicated story," said Mr Denny. "But that is essentially what is at the heart of the dispute."

The MoD, in a statement to the Penguin News, said it was disputing the level of property tax levied on its facilities, and that the government had "almost doubled the MoD's bill without prior consultation in 2007."

Mr Denny disagreed.

"That is obviously their interpretation of it," he said. "It is not right to say there was a tax increase. The taxes have never

been increased since 2002 "They had a variation to pay a smaller amount and that was time limited and subsequently the full tax is due.

He said budget shortfall of about £900,000 was mainly due to the MoD's unpaid tax

We are doing everything we can. We are not just waiting for something to fall into our laps." Asked if the Island would

effectively be bankrupt by June if the issue was not resolved, Mr Denny said: "It is a reasonable estimate of where we would be if nothing changes in the meantime."

A spokesperson for the Foreign and Commonwealth Office said it was doing all it could to resolve the dispute, but it was having a "serious impact" on the Island's budget.

"AIG is currently making efficiency savings which are necessary whether the dispute is resolved or not. But further savings will have to be found if the dispute is not resolved.

Mr Denny said he did not want to speculate on whether the airbridge would be affected as a result of the row: "The MoD operates the airbridge. We rely on it too. The MoD, like everyone else, realises how people in this part of the world and the South

Atlantic rely on the airbridge." The MoD said it was in contact with the FCO "to try to resolve this dispute urgently and seek assurance that the services it receives in return from AIG represent best value for money for the defence vote,

This dispute is between AIG and MoD and there are no foreseen threats or impacts to the South Atlantic airbridge."

Team to probe East Cove spill

A FACT-FINDING team from the UK will be investigating the fuel spill at Mare Harbour on August 4, when a quantity of sullage entered the waters of East Cove via a small stream.

The Land Accident Investigation Team (LAIT) who arrived on this week's air bridge, is an independent body of the MoD and impartial to the military at MPA. Their team of five will be headed up by a retired full Colonel.

The MoD at MPA have welcomed the arrival of the team, which will spend a month determining the cause of the spill, the subsequent response, and identify lessons, in order to prevent a repeat of the incident.

The LAIT will consult with personnel from both MPA and Falkland Islands Government.

The investigation follows the clean-up operation which was overseen by members of the FIG and Falklands Conservation.

At the time Sarah Crofts from Falklands Conservation praised the military's response to the spill: "They are doing a good job

and got straight on to it. "They're doing everything they can and being open about it," she said.

"Plus, the spill runs up to the sandspit behind Bertha's Beach so it is in a naturaly contained area."

She said if the incident had happened slightly later in the year, when more wildlife was in the area, it could have been much worse.

Monthly monitoring of the site continues by both FIG and MoD personnel, seeking to minimise any long-term harm to the the environment.

To date no damage to wildlife has been detected.

Following the fact-finding mission a full service inquiry will take place to determine if any disciplinary action should follow.

Candidates warned not to exceed election costs

THE Attorney General has written to election candidates warning them of the consequences of exceeding their limit on election expenses.

Attorney General, David Pickup, said they did not know if any candidate had exceeded the limit, but they had received information that some candidates may have done so in relation to the printing costs of their manifestos.

No particular candidates were identified.

The Attorney General said he thought it appropriate to write to each candidate to remind them of the limit on election expenses and the potential consequences if the limit was breached, which are the commission of a criminal offence and the voiding of their election as a member.

Stanley candidates can spend up to £265 on election expenses, while candidates for the Camp constituency can spend up to £351.

Tourists contribute five per cent of Islands GDP

THE Falkland Islands Tourist Board this week launched the nation's first 'Tourism Satellite Account' (TSA), a United Nations endorsed international standard for measuring the true economic impact of tourism.

The findings are the result of extensive work by the Tourist Board in conjunction with Acorn Consulting Partnership (UK), which has enabled an enlightening account of this important sector of the economy to be produced.

The TSA reveals that tourists spent £6.6 million in the Falkland Islands in the 2008-9 season, 43%of which was spent by cruise passengers, with a further 43%spent by air passengers and 14%by domestic tourists. The spend of £6.6 million represents 5% of

Typhoons dropping in

THE first official photographs of RAF Typhoons flying over the Falklands have been released.

Sqn Ldr Rich Wells and Flt Lt James Bolton flew the state-ofthe-art high tech jets for 18 hours from the UK, stopping off at Ascension Island en route.

During the trip the Typhoons conducted air-to-air refuelling from VC10s and Tri-Star tanker aircraft. The aircraft, replacing the Tornado F3s after 17 years in the Falklands, will be held on constant "quick reaction alert" (QRA), with a remit to scramble within a few minutes.

the Falkland Islands' GDP, which is a significant value in comparison with many other countries.

In the UK tourism contributes 3.4% of GDP, while in Chile the contribution is 3.8%, and 2.5% in the United States.

"Quantifying the tourism industry's true contribution to the larger Falklands economy has always been difficult," said Jake Downing, General Manager of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board.

"Tourism touches all parts of the economy, and creates income and employment in all sectors: accommodation, transport, food and beverage, retail and other services.

"The TSA makes measurement and tracking of all this a reality," he said. The Falkland Islands is one of a number of countries to have developed a TSA, which reflects the Government's commitment to tourism.

Mr Downing said it provided a tool for both the tourism industry and government to measure growth and properly plan for the future, and it would have policy implications for employment, education, infrastructure and transport.

"The launch of the TSA is an important landmark for us", said Mr Downing.

"It is thanks to the hard work of Acorn Consulting and the support of the industry here that we now have some exciting statistics which will help us plan for the future."

Economist presents a guide to the country's national accounts

IN a presentation held yesterday evening, Senior Economist and Statistical Analysist Michael Poole gave an overview of the system of National Accounts produced by FIG.

Entitled the State of the Falkland Islands Economy, the presentation looked at the economy's position in 2007, explained the process and history behind producing National Accounts and, said Mr Poole, gave people "an introduction to the concept and the first set of numbers we had produced."

National Accounts are "a set of statistics measuring the performance of the various sectors of the economy," and can provide benchmarks, highlight weaknesses, guide FIG's economic policy, and identify economic trends and opportunities. Importantly, Mr Poole said, was the use of National Accounts "for international economic comparisons and qualification criteria."

He said the figures collected would help show "we have a stable and growing economy, so that overseas investors view the Islands as a good place to do business, if this is encouraged by the local people."

In the past, basic figures were produced in the 80s and 90s. However, it wasn't until 2001 that FIG started producing more detailed National Accounts. The aim of last night's presentation was to detail and demonstrate the use of the work carried out after the visit of consultant Roger Jullion, a Canadian statistician, in January and March of this year. Mr Jullion helped "ensure what we were doing was technically correct and also relevant in helping develop the economy," Mr Poole said.

As well as benefiting government, in particular the Treasury for forecasting, this system will also help private sector businesses in identifying possible growth areas and opportunities.

Although working 12 to 18 months behind, as figures are based on the tax office data, Mr Poole said that up to the end of 2007 the economy was in a "pretty strong position," with strong growth across almost all the industries, and an overall growth of 4%, which compared favourably with other economies such as the UK and Chile. Due to the global downturn, 2008/9 may not be as strong, but that shall be made public when those numbers are produced.

Farm flyovers

FARMERS wishing to avoid low flying aircraft over their property during gathering, lambing and shearing can arrange for a temporary avoidance of overflight by requesting a Notice To Airmen (NOTAM) through the Director of Civil Aviation on 27305, fax 27302, or email ANewman.civilaviation@scc.gov.fk. A MoD spokesperson said while all aircraft made every attempt to avoid such farming activity at this time of year, it was often difficult because of the frequency, scale and number of farming activities.

Case adjourned

A MAN charged with sexual assault and common assault had his case adjourned in court on Wednesday. Joan Paul Contreras did not enter pleas to the charges, relating to an alleged incident on September 27. Jocelyn Hindmarsh, representing Mr Contreras, asked for the case to be adjourned as she was seeking advice from counsel in the UK. Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis adjourned the case to November 4 when pleas are expected to be entered.

Yachtsman with a love of laughter

DUDLEY F Gooch (Fred) was born in London on 8 April 1914. Soon after, his family moved to Clacton-on-Sea, Essex, where he spent his childhood and younger years.

He loved the sea, and decided to join the British Merchant Navy, training as an Engineer. He was involved in World War II, aboard cargo ships carrying supplies between Europe and many parts of the world.

In 1946 he settled in Argentina, and lived many years in Buenos Aires. He then moved to Fray Bentos, Uruguay, where he worked for the Anglo meat packing plant. In 1970 he moved to the Falkland Islands to run a small pilot plant established by UK-based Alginate Industries Ltd for the production of dry milled kelp. The project ran for some six years, after which Fred devoted much time and expertise on various tasks, later including acting as Marine Surveyor for Lloyds, Bureau Veritas.

He only gave up work in his early 80s and in 1994 he moved to Houston, Texas, to spend the rest of his life with his only daughter Annie and her family.

Sailing was Fred's hobby and he participated in many local and international regattas off the River Plate.

For many of his Falkland years he owned the yacht Flyd. Wherever he went Fred made many lifelong friends and played a part in the community.

Always keen to keep active, even late in life he cycled, walked, swam and even took up roller-blades. A good correspondent with a wicked sense of humour, he kept in touch with many of his friends well into his early 90s. Fred passed away peacefully at home on 10 October. He was 95.

Desire raises £42m and ups options to six wells

DESIRE Petroleum, the oil and gas group working in the North Basin of the Falklands, has raised £42 million in a 70p per share placing with predominantly new institutional investors. The move comes ahead of Desire's plans to kick off a drilling programme early next year.

While the company already has US\$40 Desir million in the bank to fund two wells in the campaign, it needs the extra cash to fund all four of the wells that it has contracted with the rig operator. Diamond Offshore Drilling (UK).

In addition, the company has now agreed an extra two well option deal, taking its options over further wells to six. Its partner in the region, Rockhopper Exploration, has now signed heads

Mr Bryant said there had inevitably been a number of real and sensitive challenges: "It is clear that a large degree of the success of the visits is attributable to the constructive and pragmatic actions of many in FIG, made all the more difficult by the impending elections."

He said the visits were important humanitarian events and asked that his thanks be passed on to all of those involved in FIG for their contribution and support towards the successful visits.

Service station fills up with new pumps

STANLEY Services Ltd have over the past weeks installed new fuel pumps on their service station forecourt.

The Gilbarco units removed have been operating since the station was opened in 1993, and pumped many millions of litres while they remained exposed and with no canopy protection to everything that the Falkland weather could throw at them.

General Manager Robert Rowlands said the units had given sterling service with very few problems, having been only refurbished once, when the chassis was replaced due to corrosion.

As sourcing of replacement spare parts had become very difficult due to the age of the pumps, and the volume of customers had greatly increased, the decision was taken to buy twin units for the diesel supply, which will allow up to four vehicles to refuel at any one time. Demand for petrol has decreased over the years and this supply has kept single hose units, one with lead replacement, and one unleaded petrol. There is also a single hose for kerosene.

The twin nozzle diesel pumps have two flow rates. The nozzle facing the shop on each pump delivers at 70 litres per minute for trucks and easy to fill vehicles, and the rear side nozzles delivers 45 litres per minute. Each nozzle has only a single hose and customers should find them lighter and more easy to handle. The new pumps made by Pumptronics Ltd of North Walsham in Norfolk were chosen for their simple robust build, being of corrosion-free stainless steel construction and operating with the same electronic language to communicate with the point of sale shop equipment.





"The experience brought a unique sensation as with eyes not providing visual guidance, other senses such as hearing were heightened," said Chief Executive Officer Donny Donosepoetro.

However, the overwhelming feeling was of how valuable the gift of sight is, and that sight restoration for underprivileged people in the world would definitely change lives, he said.

Seeing is Believing is a global campaign launched in 2003 and initiated by the employees of Standard Chartered to celebrate the Bank's 150th anniversary. The objective is to raise funds to help restore sight through a combination of preventive and curative work.

The blind walk on Saturday was a big success, with more than £3,000 raised for Seeing is Believing, while also raising awareness of the issue of blindness.

Mr Donosepoetro said: "The staff have done a remarkable job in raising both funds and awareness for SIB.

APPETISING and varied snacks are the order of the day at the IJS, with the introduction of a new healthy eating scheme for the Foundation Stage Two class.



Medic: Saving Lives From Dunkirk To Afghanistan hits the bookshelves next week, telling the story of the military medics, doctors and stretcher-bearers whose incredible courage and skill saved lives on the front lines. The following extract was published in the Daily Mail earlier this month, and focuses on Army medics who came face to face with the horror of the Falklands War...

AS he advanced with his battalion through a barrage of enemy mortar shells towards the hamlet of Goose Green. Para medical officer Captain Steven Hughes desperately wanted to be on some other enterprise.

"Beam me up, Scotty," he muttered into the drizzle of the South Atlantic winter, recoiling as a round from a sniper's rifle whistled over his head.

"Take me back to the NHS and I'll work 24 hours a day. 365 days a year," he pledged. "This is not what I spent all those years at medical school for.

When appointed as an Army doctor, he had been treated as a waste of space by the macho fighting men of the Paras, as insignificant as a cook or a clerk - until they went to war.

On the British Task Force's long sea journey south to retake the Falkland Islands from their Argentinian occupiers, he watched these tough guys wake up to his importance to them. As he drilled them in the basics of first aid and what to do if their bellies were split open by a bullet and their guts spilled out, he sensed respect. "I was no longer considered an idle knacker, but someone who might well save their life," he said. And now he was in the killing zone with them, doing just that.

He set up his aid post in a gully. It was freezing cold and the smell of cordite was acrid in the air. There was no shelter, not a single tree and scarcely a bush. It was hard to believe how recently he had been working in the warm and dry, in an over-heated London hospital.

The battle was just yards away. Gunfire was too close for comfort. Incoming mortars were as loud as express trains. Wounded soldiers were being brought in all the time, and Hughes and his small team of medics moved between the rows on the ground, dressing injuries and administering fluids, morphine and antibiotics.

Deciding priorities was heartrending. Every case was urgent, but which ones should he concentrate on? He knelt over a soldier with multiple cannon fragments in his side and neck, and air

leaking through punctures in his throat. His shredded battledress was like blotting paper soaked in his own blood.

Another soldier was half-hidden under a sheet of corrugated metal with part of his brain squeezing out of his head like toothpaste from a tube. He was still conscious_

Surprisingly, he was the least of Hughes's worries. This soldier could wait, he decided. "If he's survived this long, he isn't in immediate danger."

In any case, there wasn't a brain specialist at the Task Force's field hospital - a ramshackle warehouse once used for packing mutton - a helicopter ride away at Ajax Bay. The surgeons there would be better off operating on someone with a more easily treatable wound.

Some of his assistants misunderstood and thought Hughes had put the man to one side to die. One was preparing to do the humane thing and give him a fatal dose of morphine. Hughes intervened just in time Eventually, the man got his place on a helicopter. He survived But, on the battlefield and in the fog of war, that was how narrow the line was between life and death.

Lance Corporal Bill Bentley, a medic assisting Hughes, was learning this firsthand as, with a medical pack on his back and Sterling sub-machine gun slung over his shoulder, he went out into the fighting to find casualties.

"You're driven on by the thought that your mates are out there, dving and injured." he said.

One of those he brought back was an old friend his brains blown out. As he carried a corner of the poncho in which the body was laid. Bentley's knee kept banging against the dead soldier's slumped head. It made a hollow, knocking sound he would never be able to erase from his memory.

On another foray, he leapt into an enemy trench and felt a body beneath a tarpaulin move under his feet. The soldier in him outweighed the medic and he fired into the bundle. This was no time to take chances.

But he did just that with another Argentinian soldier, a youngster shot through the leg and in deep shock. "He made no aggressive gestures, so I hoisted him over my shoulder and carried him to our own lines." he said.

Only later did he stop to consider that the enemy dangling down his back could have snatched his bayonet and killed him.

Even braver was his rescue of Private Dave 'Chopsey' Gray, who was bleeding to death in no-man's-land after a mortar shell had practically

torn off his right leg, shattered the other and filled him with shrapnel. Bob Cole, one of Gray's mates, distraught and in tears, managed to reach the aid post to beg for help. "No problem. I'll go," said Bent-

He ducked down and followed Cole up a hill and through a gap in a stone wall. They could see Chopsey 25 yards away on the other side of the slope, lying in a shallow crater in a pool of his own blood and fully exposed to the enemies' guns. Bentley crept down to him.

Para legend has it that when Gray was hit, he shouted: "I've lost me f***ing leo!" One of his mates behind a nearby tussock replied! "No, you haven't. Chopsey. It's ust landed over here.'

In fact, it was still attached, though not by much. When Bentley reached him, he realised that a desperate situation called for desperate measures. "I would have to amputate what was left of his right leg."

He took out his Swiss Army knife, one blade of which he kept razor sharp for emergencies. Lying flat as bullets flew over his head, he sliced away the flesh and sinew, which was all that was keeping the leg attached.

Gray "just cringed" at this battlefield amputation without anaesthetic - shock must have gone some way to dull the pain. The medic was tourniqueting the stump when a stretcher party came racing across the hillside towards him. The enemy fire intensified and more bullets peppered into the peat.

"The hill seemed to be exploding. It felt as if the whole Argentinian army was opening up at us," said Bentley. The rescue team threw Gray on to the stretcher and, not forgetting the severed leg, ran back up the hill, chased by a line of bullets detonating in the dirt behind them like fireworks.

Back at the aid post, Hughes fought desperately to save the wounded soldier, who had lost so much blood that the doctor couldn't find a He had to cut away with a scalpel to make an opening for fluids.

vein in his deathly white skin.

Hughes put him at the top of the queue for immediate evacuation by helicopter. "But I didn't hold out too much hope for his survival." he said. Bentley helped lift the man he had risked his life to save intoa casualty pod on the chopper's side. The sawn-off remnant of his leg went, too.

"I don't think it was until that moment that he realised exactly what had happened." said Bentley. "He just stared at it. I hugged him, gave him a kiss and said: 'You'll be all right'. Then I closed the top of the pod and they flew him out." Gray was conscious when he was brought into Ajax Bay, breathing hard as if he whose Tornado bomber was shot had just run a marathon and gabbling nonsense. He had no discernible pulse or blood pressure. When the tourniquet the Daily Mail and a former deputy was removed, the leg stump was dry - no blood was getting through. He needed an im-

mediate transfusion. A medic grabbed some bags of blood - it was kept "refrigerated" outside in the Antarctic cold, wrapped in wet hessian - and warmed them under his armpits to take off the chill before the blood was dripped into veins that were already beginning to collapse and close up. Three litres later, on the sixth bag, the stump began to ooze blood. There was colour in Chopsey's cheeks - he was going to make it.

Night was falling at the end of a dreadful day. At Goose Green, the battle slowed and then halted. A desperately tired Hughes could at last take stock. His records, scrawled on notepads smeared with blood, showed he had treated 34 Paras and dozens of Argentine casualties.

Stretched out in a gully behind a gorse bush were those who had been beyond saving. They looked, he thought, like shop dummies, except for the bullet hole in the middle of one forehead.

"It felt unreal. A few hours ago I had spoken to some of these people, and now they were gone." he said. As for all those casualties he had sent to Ajax Bay, he found it impossible to believe any of them could have survived, so basic had been the emergency care he felt he had been able to give them.

The next morning, he awoke to hear that the Argentinians had surrendered. The battle of Goose Green - the first step in recovering the Falklands - was over.

Hughes did what he could for the enemy wounded, though they were mystified by his compassion. "Why you treat me?" one asked in faltering English, as the doctor put him on a drip.

The answer was that it was his duty to treat everyone equally, friend or foe. The Geneva Convention demanded it of him, but he also demanded it of himself. All medics did.

The last Argentinian casualty was brought in. more dead than alive, and everyone worked to save him. He had lain on the battlefield for a dayand-a-half before he was discovered at the bottom of a pile of corpses in a waterlogged trench. With a bullet in one eye, and a broken hand and leg, he was rigid with cold, but also running a fever. He should have been dead from the gangrene that was eating into him, except that the cold had paralysed the infection and the fever had kept him from freezing. He was warmed up and given blood. When he was operated on, the anaesthetist ventilated him by hand for two hours, squeezing the life back into him breath by breath. The soldier survived and went home, one-eyed

and one-legged.


Others would not be going home. At Ajax Bay, the dozen dead Paras from Goose Green were lined up on stretchers side by side on a concrete strip. It was a grim, sad business as their clothes were cut away and their personal possessions bagged to be returned to their relatives.

It fell to Surgeon Commander Rick Jolly, the doctor in charge, to examine each body, pronounce on cause of death and complete a field death certificate. He crouched as he went from man to man and called out his conclusions to a clerk, who scribbled them down - gunshot wounds to the heart, multiple wounds to chest and abdomen, blast injury

On the face of the dead Colonel 'H' Jones, the 2 Para commander whose heroic but fatal dash had played a large part in breaking the Argentinian resistance. Jolly saw a quizzical smile.

His eyes were open, but he looked peaceful. A single bullet had killed him. "I closed his eyes gently. Then we lifted him, placed his body into a plastic shroud and then into a body bag." Shortly afterwards, Steven Hughes, his face grey with

fatigue, flew in for the funerals. He avoided Jolly's eyes, which surprised the surgeon. He knew and liked the Para doctor, and had heard nothing but praise for him from the casualties who had passed through his hands.

Jolly opened his mouth to speak, but was silenced by an outburst from Hughes, apologising, absurdly, for not having done enough in the middle of the battlefield and for sending back so many casualties in poor condition. Jolly interrupted this flow of desperate remorse. Hughes had nothing to blame himself for. Every one of the wounded paratroopers ferried from Goose Green to the hospital was alive.

Hughes was incredulous. All the way in on the helicopter, he had been dreading discovering how many more of his men had died from their injuries. Jolly gripped his arms and, almost shouting to get home his point, declared: "No, Steve. no! They are all still alive." Hughes shook his head. It could not be so. He pulled out his field notebook and picked a name. "What about this one? Private Grav?"

Jolly jumped in: "Do you mean Chopsey? I looked after him myself. Virtually ex-sanguinated when he got here, but he's fine now."

Hughes stared in amazement as the truth sank in. Then the colour returned to his cheeks, just as it had to Chopsey's. He was transfused with relief and joy. All those battered young bodies he had administered to on the edge of a raging battle. patched up as best he could and then sent back down the line, were alive! But his sense of achievement did not last.

"We had been through an experience none of us had ever expected," he would recall. He felt himself shutting down emotionally, blanking out the awful pictures of suffering. Later, years after he had left the Army, they would come back to haunt and overwhelm him.

He learned what few other people, soldiers or civilians, realise: that medics are steeped in the horrors of war in a way that no one else ever can be. All the carnage comes funnelling through them. They can't look the other way.

Other soldiers may see mates wounded or be injured themselves. But only the medics see the non-stop pain and misery of war. They run their eye over the butcher's bill and many of them, like Hughes, pay the price with their peace of mind.



Staff shortages and additional FIGAS charges have meant Camp visits have been reduced making many patients cross. The Medical Department has a duty of care to all and just because the Camp population are further away and a little out of sight they should not be out of mind.

It is vitally important Doctors visits remain perhaps in a more structured 'surgery-like' venue at Fox Bay/Hill Cove or Goose Green/North Arm where patients could attend pre-booked appointments.

If Islanders are sick and require urgent flight to Stanley or to Chile there should never be any quibbles over cost, this part of the service should be sacrosanct

Camp children get a solid grounding in education and when they move into Stanley to the Community School a 'Hostel' with all its facilities should be available. With fewer pupils from Camp, staff numbers could be reduced if they ran a Liberty Lodge style house with House parents being cooks, cleaners and nursemaids. Further and Higher education awards should be based on academics and attitude. Fortunately our youngsters are confident and proud of their heritage and make superb junior ambassadors when away at college and long may it continue.

Health has many areas that need consideration but they are already working towards smarter outcomes like the vulnerable peoples strategy. Work has also gone into reducing the medical costs in Chile by negotiating with the hospital and hotels. 





Attorney General says sorry for election expenses blunder



Oddities, rarities and collectibles made up the bulk of the titles on offer at Saturday's book fair, hosted by Phil Middleton at the Cathedral Parish Hall. Sarah Preston from MPA was one of a steady stream of visitors to pick up a few bargains.

THE Attorney General has apologised to each of the 18 General Election candidates after admitting an expenses blunder which could have impacted on their campaigns.

As candidates lodged their nominations, they were advised of the limits imposed on them – by law – of their allowable campaign expenses. They were £265 for candidates standing for Stanley and £351 for those standing for Camp.

But those limits – originally set in 1989 – were incorrect.

They had been superceded by legislation passed in 2001, permitting Stanley and Camp candidates to spend up to £500 and £600 respectively on their pre-election campaign material.

The 2001 limits were advised and applied in both the 2005 General Election and the by-election of January 2008, but they were overlooked for this year's campaign.

To add insult to injury, Attorney General David Pickup last Thursday sent a letter to candidates warning them of the consequences of exceeding the outdated expenses limits.

As reported in the Penguin News, Mr Pickup said his office had received information that one or more candidates might have exceeded their approved campaign budget, and he had warned all candidates by letter of the penalties they could potentially suffer. No candidates were identified, but they were told a breach of those rules could constitute a criminal offence and disqualification from standing for the Legislative Assembly.

This advice, though, was based on the spending limits which expired eight years ago.

One candidate believed they had been a target of complaints which had reached the Attorney General's office, and sought independent legal advice.

It was as a result of those inquiries that the mistaken imposition of outdated legislation – and upon which the "warning" letter from the Attorney General's office was based – was exposed.

"They could have screwed my campaign and made me look corrupt," the candidate told the Penguin News.

Mr Pickup later sent another letter to candidates, in which he said he recognised and acknowledged responsibility for the error.

"It should not have happened," he said.

"We have apologised to candidates and made that apology public. We regret what has occurred, and the impact of this on candidates.

"It is fortunate that we were able to correct the error in time for it to have no adverse impact on the election itself."

Servicemen shot in training

A MILITARY investigation has been launched to determine how three servicemen were hospitalised after a training exercise at Onion Range. It is understood they had been shot, late on Tuesday night.

The three were immediately medically evacuated to the King Edward Memorial Hospital in Stanley by Sea King Helicopter where they received treatment. One of them is believed to have sustained spinal injuries and was later flown to the UK for treatment.

A military spokesman was unable to confirm details of the injuries or how they had been inflicted. "The next of kin of those injured in the incident have been informed and a full investigation into the cause of the incident is ongoing," he said.

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Another fisheries snub for Islands

THE attendance of a representative from the Falkland Islands Government at a Fisheries Conference in Cuba has been cancelled at short notice, with the reason believed to be interference from the Argentine Government.

Pia Schuchert from the Fisheries Department was due to attend the Organizing Committee of the 13th Latin American Congress of Marine Sciences this week. However, the organisers of the conference cancelled Pia's attendance at very short notice, with according to Director of Natural Resources John Barton, no real reason given as yet as to why.

This is the second occasion when the Falklands have been turned away from a fishing conference in a short period of time.

Councillor Cockwell and Fisheries Department scientist Sasha Arkhipkin were not allowed to speak at the World Fishing Exhibition they attended by invitation in Vigo, Spain last month after the organisers of the event yielded to pressure from Argentina.

Mr Barton however said the Vigo incident was slightly differ-

New telecom report still under wraps

THE latest report into the future of telecommunications and associated legislation in the Falklands has been received by the government - but it may not be published in the immediate future.

The report, the second this year from government consultant Dr Chris Doyle, was received last week.

Attorney General David Pickup said the report would now be considered and a decision made on whether it was appropriate for it to be released now or be considered by Executive Council first so that a government response could accompany publication of the report.

Consideration also needs to be given to any commercially sensitive areas that might need to be excluded and Cable and Wireless are being consulted on this.

Mr Pickup said that should it be possible to publish the report prior to the election they would need to consider whether that was an appropriate step to take.

He said in making the decision the arguments the Chamber of Commerce had put forward in favour of publication prior to the election, and all other arguments pointing in favour or against publication at that time, would be considered. ent in that it was more of a government to government arrangement while the conference in Cuba was purely scientific. He said Falklands fishery scientists had attended many such conferences in the past and there had not been any problem.

"The cancellation can only have been done on political grounds rather than scientific," said Mr Barton, adding, "The behaviour of the committee can only be described as disgraceful."

For fishery scientist Pia Schuchert the late cancellation was disappointing for two reasons.

She had been preparing for the conference for quite some time and was looking forward to talking to and exchanging useful data with other scientists about general marine research projects and in particular ongoing studies of Hoki.

Pia had also arranged for her parents to travel from Germany to meet her in Cuba. She has not seen them for one and a half years. While they continue with their scheduled holiday, Pia must now make other plans to meet up with her parents.

Dusty spins historic first song

BFBS Radio Afghanistan went live on air this week, broadcasting from Camp Bastion to British Forces across Afghanistan and the Middle East.

It also became the first BFBS Radio frontline operational station to connect troops in theatre live and direct with their families at home, via digital radio.

BFBS Radio listeners across the Forces world were asked to choose what should be the first song played on the new station.

Dusty Miller, formerly of BFBS Radio in the Falklands, was the first presenter on BFBS Radio in Afghanistan: "Mindful of the very particular brand of humour among our listeners, we were worried what they might foist on us," he said.

"The first song played on the ground in any operational theatre tends to get a bit of an iconic status, and becomes a tune that in some ways sums up a particular tour."

The winner was "Wake Up Boo" by The Boo Radleys.

Warning to candidates based on flawed advice

ATTORNEY General David Pickup has admitted the letter he sent to candidates warning them against exceeding election campaign expenses was based on figures which expired eight years ago.

Andrea Clausen, a member of the Legislative Assembly up until its mandatory pre-election dissolution earlier this month, exposed the error after seeking legal advice.

She spent £310 on campaign brochures after receiving confirmation from Deputy Returning Officer John Rowland that she was permitted to use up to an additional £100 unspecified expenses, on top of what was then thought to be the statutory limit of £265 for Stanley candidates.

But on receiving the letter from the Attorney General warning of the repercussions of overspend Mrs Clausen said she was "very distressed," as she had never before had reason to question her integrity either as an elected member or as a member of the community: "They could have screwed my campaign and made me look corrupt," she said.

Mrs Clausen said she had acted within the guidelines and advice from those running the election, and her conscience was elear, but she had felt "a significant amount of stress" in believing there was a possibility she may have unwittingly committed a criminal offence. Candidates contacted by the Penguin News said they were surprised to learn their true expenses budget was for some almost double that of which they had been advised at the start of the campaign.

Norman Besley-Clark said the error did "not not bode well for the remaining procedures," considering the administration had four years to prepare for the election: "More to the point, I do not expect such elementary mistakes from senior members of the administration, who collectively cost the taxpayer in excess of £180,000 per annum in salaries."

Jan Cheek said she had assumed the rules issued by the Returning Officer were the ones in force and had taken care to work within them: "I do not believe people are looking for expensive glossy brochures. They want to know where candidates stand on issues that are important to them. Candidates already have to find their £100 deposit and being expected to compete by spending many hundreds on a campaign could be a deterrent to some."

Sharon Halford said: "It goes to show that nobody is perfect and we can all make mistakes. But I would have expected the AG to have a better grasp of the law. He does after all advise Exco. I was not looking to spend money unnecessarily in campaigning. Besides, if I were to waste money campaigning what hope would there be if I ended up being tasked to help run the country?"

Ian Hansen said he would not have conducted his campaign any differently, had he known at the beginning of the campaign all candidates had a greater permissible expenses budget: "I imagine it is easy enough to miss something like this amongst the enormous amount of other legislation."

Bill Luxton said he was appalled, but not surprised to learn of the error, "in view of the shambles in the way this election has been run. The Pickup-Padgett-Thorogood trio are so out of touch they might be on another planet." Janet Robertson said she had set her mind to "a certain level of campaigning possibilities" based on the initial limits of which she was advised. She said it was "inconceivable" it had taken eight years for the error to come to light: "If an issue had not been raised this time, one can only imagine that it may have taken another several years before it did. At least all candidates have had the same information at the same time and have not been disadvantaged in comparison to others."

Dick Sawle said he did not think it was a "major scandal." He said although Camp candidates could incur extra travelling expenses, "it should be possible to keep costs down and print a manifesto within the $\pounds 265$ (Stanley) allowance. But how can the man in the street be expected to know and understand the laws and regulations that govern him, when the government itself has to be advised of its own laws by a local solicitor?"

Gavin Short said the extra funds did not impact on his campaign, but he was "extremely perturbed" such a mistake could have happened: "Especially given the language used in the first email from the legal department. Someone is going to have to give a pretty darn good explanation as to how this could have happened. I am certainly worried by this. What other laws have been forgotten?"

Mike Summers said while it was irritating the mistake had apparently benefited some, he was not "hugely exercised" by it. When considering the printing of his own manifesto he said he sought costings for it, and when the quote was clearly in excess of that allowed he dropped the idea: "The amount now left of £235 is not sufficient for a full distribu-

tion, and the amount already spent cannot be unspent," he said.

The Penguin News offered all candidates the opportunity to comment on this story.

Economist dies

FORMER government economist and financial advisor Dr Richard Carl Wagner died in Canada on Thursday October 15. Mr Wagner held a number of senior positions in government during his 11 years in the Islands. Well respected for his professionalism, pragmatic approach, sound advice and dedication. Mr Wagner worked as as an independent adviser for the Pensions Board and FIG on a number of projects after he returned to Canada in 2001.

Inquest verdict

A VERDICT of accidental death was recorded by Coroner John Trevaskis at an inquest into the death of Jonathon Andrew Clark. Mr Trevaskis said he was satisfied by the evidence, which revealed the deceased had a history of heart attacks, and his blood contained an abnormally high concentration of alcohol. He sustained a head injury which was consistent with falling down the stairs at Waverley House on August 29.

Art exhibition

AN exhibition by local artist Richard Cockwell will be held in the Malvina House Hotel on Sunday from 10am to 6pm. All the pieces on display have been commissioned for the hotel. However prints and commissions of the artist's work will be available to order on the day.

Historic treaty

ARGENTINA and Chile are today due to seal a "historic" integration and cooperation agreement. The treaty is an update of the 1984 treaty which paved the way for closer relations between the neighbouring countries that only a few years before had been on the verge of war.

Rover rolls over

A MILITARY Land Rover 110 rolled over on the road to the Lady Elizabeth on Tuesday. Five military personnel were in the vehicle, and at least one was thought to have suffered broken bones. Two were sent to the KEMH. Military police are investigating the accident.

Review of student sanctions

CONCERNS that the Falklands expect a higher standard of behaviour from overseas students than the colleges they attend has prompted the Education Board to consult with Peter Symonds and Chichester colleges on sanctions for drug or alcohol abuse or violent behaviour.

A revised paper was put before the board on Monday with the recommendation that "a second occurrence of drugs and/or alcohol and/or violent and/or criminal behaviour will result in a complete withdrawal of funding" for both further and higher education students.

The paper was still met with some trepidation from Board members.

Janet Robertson said it would be unfair to treat youngsters who were caught in a pub drinking underage the same as a drug dealer.

"There are misdemeanours and misdemeanours," she said. "There are different levels."

Her view was echoed by Richard Stevens. Board member Karen Lee said if the paper was approved it would mean Falklands students would not only be expected to achieve higher grades, but would also be expected to behave better.

Mrs Lee said: "So we are proposing higher expectations than the colleges themselves."

She said she would prefer to see a "three strikes and you're out" system introduced.

The Education Department had solicited views from parents and students on the subject, however only two responses were received.

THE number of available appointments to see a doctor at the KEMH next week has had to be reduced. Normal service will be resumed from November 9, when there will again be a full complement of doctors. The cooperation and understanding of patients would be much appreciated, said Director of Health Derek Muhl.

Director's report on education

ISSUES covered in the Director of Education's Report this month, included the Plumber's Workshop site, of which the first phase is almost complete.

At the meeting held on Monday, October 26, it was detailed that the second phase would involve the transfer of the entire Training Centre to the site, which is unlikely to happen until the new Assembly has considered the proposal.

It was noted by members of the board that it would cost £30,000 for an access road to be built, as there were safety issues involved with going through the power station compound. Board member Janet Robertson said: "It might be cheaper to solve the safety issues, rather than build a new road." The details were still under negotiation, Acting Director of Education, Richard Fogerty said.

A number of comments were made regarding the dress code for the Community School.

It was accepted that low-slung trousers and low cut tops should be banned. However, Richard Stevens said: "I would say a skirt and leggings was quiet modest."

Janet Robertson agreed: "I think actually it's rather severe." The board members agreed

with the rules regarding restrictions on the wearing of jewellery. In England all primary schools

are expected to introduce a foreign language into the curriculum over the next two years.

At the Infant and Junior School Years 5 and 6 are having one hour of Spanish lesson per week from FILO. If this proves successful, and funds permit, it is hoped this will move down to Years 3 and 4. Richard Fogerty said: "I think

Richard Fogerty said: "I think it's an excellent idea, it should be encouraged."

The Leisure Centre has been transferred to the Director of Procurement and Efficiency as from October 1. However, the Education Department will be providing some support for payroll and the budget for the interim period.

Research vessel gathers valuable new evidence

THE Fisheries Research vessel Castelo returns to FIPASS on Monday after two weeks at sea carrying out surveys in the southwest of the Falkland Islands Interim Conservation Zone (FICZ).

Carrying six staff from the Fisheries Department led by Chief Scientist Dr Alexander Arkhipkin the team has been studying the distribution and biology of hoki and Patagonian hakes during their post spawning migration to Falklands waters as well as the grenadier community in deeper parts of the Falkland slope.

An oceanographic survey of the entire area studied was also carried out.

Four to five trawls were planned for each day, with two days allowed for bad weather. Plankton stations were surveyed in the evening after trawl operations were completed.

This is the first in-depth research to be carried out since the former research vessel Dorado was decommissioned some 18 months ago, leaving the Fisheries Department without an independent research facility.

The Castelo is a 1321 tonne 67 metre trawler which has been fishing in the Islands for some years. Owned by Ferralemes Ltd with Red Back Consultants (RBC) as the local venture, a number of modifications were carried out to the vessel in Montevideo earlier this year which included the construction of a dry lab.

Dr Arkhipkin said the Fisheries Department was delighted with the modifications to the vessel.

Dr Paul Brickle said using a dedicated research vessel allowed the team to conduct complex sampling stations, simultaneously collecting accurate data on catch weight and composition, oceanography and trawl geometry.

raphy and trawl geometry. "This data will enable us to explain the distribution of biomass of various commercial species within Falklands waters," he said, adding that using one vessel and standard gear, stock assessment surveys would be more accurate.

"We will have the flexibility to gain a greater insight into the Falkland Islands marine ecosystem, essential to the management of our fishery," said Dr Brickle.

Clinica Alemana set to invest US\$150m

CLINICA Alemana, a major private hospital in Santiago where patients from the Falklands are referred for treatment, has announced plans to expand its medical centre with a new building in Vitacura.

An investment of US\$150 million is planned for the new building and for expansion to its existing medical centre in La Dehesa over the next three years. Among the plans slated for the Vitacura building are 80 hospital beds, 500 parking spaces, and possibly a maternity ward.

Director of Health Derek Muhl said the expansion was unlikely to have an impact on Falklands overseas referrals unless the facilities expanded so that they were more cost effective.

He said there had been no discussion at this point.

At the moment treatment is paid for at the Clinica Alemana whereas in the UK it is free. The announcement of the investment comes just two weeks after Clinica Alemana's 1,249 unionised hospital employees, including nurses, paramedics and secretaries, went on a ten-day strike.

They were demanding a monthly salary raise of \$40,000 Chilean pesos (CH), roughly US\$75, plus bonuses for seniority and a general workers bonus. The strike was resolved after both sides agreed on a salary adjustment of CH\$27,000 (US\$50) and a general bonus of CH\$206,000 (US\$389), with no seniority bonus.

The company claimed "tough competition with other private clinics" made it impossible to comply with union's requests.

In 2008, the clinic earned a net profit of US\$24 million, nearly double that of competing clinics Las Condes and Santa Maria.

Election machine ready to roll out the ballots

DEPUTY Returning Officer John Rowland urges all those eligible to vote on Thursday, November 5.

"It's very important. It's been well publicised who the candidates are, it only takes a few minutes. I would encourage everybody young and old to come and put a cross on, on the day."

The process of collecting and counting ballots on election day will involve 20 people, with ten maming polling stations across the Islands and a further ten counting ballots after the polling stations close. The count is anticipated to take up until 8.30pm for Stanley, and until 7.15pm for Camp, assuming a recount is not necessary.

Mr Rowland said it was possible Chief Executive Tim Thorogood might announce the Camp result immediately after the count is completed, however this decision would be left to his discretion.

During the day five people will be based in the court room of the Town Hall to collect ballots.

There will be a person based at Goose Green. Fox Bay and on the mobile polling station on East Falkland, with two on the West mobile polling station.

Mr Rowland said: "It's a lot less than last time, as there are not so many polling stations going out. Unfortunately it's been slightly restricted this year with the

budget, which has reflected on the number of polling stations that we put out."

Despite the lower number of polling stations. Mr Rowland hoped this would not have a negative impact on the number of Camp votes received: "We have been chasing people to encourage postal votes. There have been a lot more issued this year than in previous years where I've been involved in the election" he said.

"We won't know the number until the day. I am hoping that as many people as possible vote somehow."

The static polling stations will be based at Stanley. Goose Green and Fox Bay, with Stanley closing at 6pm, and Goose Green and Fox Bay at 4pm. The ballot box at Fox Bay will be brought in to Stanley by FIGAS, and the Goose Green box will be returned by road. There will be a mobile polling station at Hope Cottage for two hours and a mobile polling station visiting the hospital and sheltered accommodation in Stanley. There will also be a station that will visit Hill Cove on Tuesday, which will then drive to Port Howard, to return to Stanley on the Wednesday.

Mr Rowland assured that "people can vote at any one of the stations, even if they are not in the same constituency."

Anyone from Camp can vote at the Town Hall, for example.

Spoiled voting papers are a rarity in the Falklands. Mr Rowland said: "People are particularly conscientious. In the last 12 years, I can only ever recall two papers with spoilt votes.

"The best way is to read the instructions when you get the ballot paper, and think where you want to put the crosses." Examples of a spoilt ballot would be using more votes than you are allocated (a maximum of five for Stanley, and three for Camp), ripping the paper by mistake, identifying yourself on the paper or attempting to cross out one vote and replace it with another. Mr Rowland said: "If you do ruin it by making a mistake, go back to the person issuing the ballot papers and ask for another one.

Rugby tour is propaganda

Saints and sailors: how faith and courage won in the South Atlantic

STORIES of courageous endeavour abound here in the Falkland Islands. Next week provides an important opportunity to recall one of the less well-known.

It is now 150 years since eight men of a missionary party based at Keppel Island were murdered by Yaghan Indians on Navarino Island, Tierra del Fuego.

The world first heard of the indigenous inhabitants of "Land of Fire" in 1830, when Captain Fitzroy returned on HMS Beagle from his first expedition to chart the coastline of southern South America.

Fitzroy, a man of deep religious convictions, had brought four Yaghans with him to England and, at his own expense, provided for their Christian education and practical training. The Yaghans returned aboard the Beagle with Fitzroy in 1832, together with a certain Mr Charles Darwin.

Fitzroy hoped all that had been learned in England might be shared for the benefit of other Fuegians.

Darwin, for his part, was shocked and appalled when he first encountered naked "uncivilised" Yaghans. He did not believe them to be fully human. But Fitzroy insisted there was nothing in the Bible about "lower races," only human beings "made in the image and likeness of God."

Subsequent attempts to engage Fuegian Indians ended in the tragic death by-starvation in 1851 of Allen Gardiner and his party of six Christian missionaries.

But Gardiner's dying vision of a mission base on the Falkland Islands was realised in 1855 when his Patagonian Missionary Society established itself on Keppel

Island. Soon regular visits were made in the schooner Allen Gardiner to Tierra del Fuego and eventually Yaghans spent time at Keppel-to gain experience in farming and house building, and to learn of the Christian faith.

But just when the ambitious enterprise seemed to be bearing fruit, tragedy struck. A party of nine sailed from Keppel to establish a base at Wulaiya, in Tierra del Fuego itself. Only the ship's cook Alfred Cole, 23, remained aboard the Allen Gardiner on Sunday November 6 1859, while the others went ashore for their morning service.

In Cole's own words: "Soon after they landed. I looked up and saw some naked fellows taking the oars out of the long-boat... then I saw our people running out of the house, and the natives hitting them with their clubs. I saw Captain Fell and Mr Fell fall.

"The others, except Hugh McDonald, I saw struck and fail; but Mr Philips and one of the Swedish sailors ran to the beach. and got up to their knees in water to try and launch a canoe but [an Indian] threw a stone, and struck Mr Philips, which made him lean to one side, and then to the other, and then he fell, when he was dragged ashore and killed, and the Swede too."

It now seems likely that rivalry among Fuegians themselves, exacerbated by a general humiliation after missionaries' accused them of stealing, led to the violent outburst and the bloody massacre.

It was all too much for George Despard who returned to England leaving Keppel Island in the care of his 18-year-old adopted son, Thomas Bridges.

Bridges was a gifted linguist who, together with the new leader Rev Waite Stirling, injected fresh vigour into the work.

Together, these men won the hearts of Yaghans, living among them simply and without desire for revenge.

Bridges is credited with the founding of Ushuaia, and Stirling went on to serve as Bishop of the Falkland Islands and throughout South America.

Darwin became a donor and supporter of the continuing efforts of the mission, which eventually moved to Tierra del Fuego, and in 1911 sold Keppel Island.

Although the outreach to Fuegians was, and continues to be controversial, it is invidious in our day to judge the missionaries' motives and intent.

What cannot be doubted however is the courage and commitment which sustained these Christians of an earlier era, who will be commemorated at a special service in the Cathedral on Friday November 6 at 5pm.

Major livestock changes needed for Meat Company to progress

AS most farmers in the Falkland Islands will already be aware, government has commissioned from the FIG Policy Unit and FIDC a full review of the Sand Bay meat plant.

This review is being carried out in two main parts – Part 1 is an Economic Impact Analysis by the Policy Unit and measures the direct benefits and costs of FIMCo and how its indirect and induced effects ripple through the economy, and Part II, led by FIDC, is a business review of the company and considers its future viability and sustainability as a commercial enterprise as part of the rural and urban economies.

Both parts will work together and the results of Part II will feed back into the final version of Part I. The combination of results will then enable conclusions and recommendations to be drawn up and included in the final report to FIG. This is expected to be in November, in time for consideration by the newly-elected government. The heart of the review is essentially a realistic but ambitious tenyear business plan for the company that, if feasible and if approved, would provide both FIG and livestock suppliers with a degree of planning certainty that would allow rational decisionmaking with respect to operating and capital funding (FIG and FIMCo) and flock structure and farm planning (livestock suppliers).

In developing the business review, it is clear that, if FIMCo is to progress and de-

In Finite 18 to progress and develop into a commercially sustainable business, then major changes and improvements must be made to the quantity, mix and quality of livestock into the plant. It is also clear that, to achieve the required levels of supply, a collective and unified effort will have to be made by the suppliers, the RBA, the DoAg and FIMCo to meet the necessary targets.

With this objective in mind, FIDC has set up a FIMCo Suppliers Working Group that is chaired by FIDC and currently has 15 members – including nine livestock suppliers, the RBA, the

DoAg, the Policy Unit and FIMCo. The farming participation is from East and West Falklands as well as the islands. The principal objective of the group is to assist in establishing and maintaining a coherent and organised livestock (lamb. sheep and beef) supply chain to FIMCo that will provide for improved

planning and co-ordinated strategies to the benefit of all.


The group has already reviewed and agreed the ten-year livestock supply projections that form the basis of the developing business plan for FIMCo, and current work revolves around determining the necessary development of collective supplier performance over the next ten years in areas such as ewe flock expansion, sheep mortality, lambing percentages, lamb growth rates and turn-off rates for wethers, in order to achieve those projections. This work will also assist the RBA and the DoAg in bringing forward appropriate support strategies to

assist as and where resources allow.

The work of the group so far has been impressively collaborative and constructive, and certainly belies the old saw that farmers are all so independently minded that they can never work together. The work of the Suppliers Group also complements the work of the other FIMCo-related group established by FIDC - the Livestock Transportation Working Group and the efforts made by all the participants in this other forum are also highly demonstrative of a willingness to work together to the benefit of all.

The objectives of the FIMCo Livestock Suppliers Working Group also include the sharing of business and farming information among members of the group and other FIMCo suppliers, with the intention of collaborating to assist all suppliers in making farming business and strategic decisions by sharing data, knowledge and examples. It is also hoped that this can be developed, with the assistance of the DoAg, to possibly attract new suppliers to FIMCo.

FOR those of you who know me, there is absolutely no need for me to introduce myself, you know of me and my background, warts and all.

To those of you who don't then you have probably had a very lucky escape. To give a brief background, I am Falklands born and bred. I am a product of our education system. Apart from one year away from the Islands in Chile I have passed my entire 47 years here. I have served on the Council before, some 15 or so years ago

I have no business interests or affiliations. The only "interest" that | have is with the local union, my Islands and its people

I am offering myself as a candidate as I feel that I have something to offer these Islands. Good old fashioned Falkland Island common sense, which seems to be sadly lacking nowadays, and a complete and utter belief in my country and its people.

I am an ordinary Islander, I have a full time job as well as a couple of part time ones to help make ends meet and perhaps get ahead a little, just like a good many of you out there.

Somewhere along the way this last council has lost touch with the public. I am getting a feeling from talking to people that in spite of regular public meetings and white papers on this and green papers on that, there is no genuine communication with the people here. This isn't helped by the weird management speak that seems to have crept in; at times you almost need an interpreter to get things into plain English. People feel that no one cares about the ordinary person any more and their views don't count. They are being told what is going to happen, like it or lump it. I can promise you that with me your views

WILL count, I will speak in plain English and do my utmost to stop this flow of gobbledyqook

The economy:

Two years ago I said that I could feel the chill wind of an economic slowdown starting to blow. I have been proved right. To be honest with you, I think things are going to get a little worse before they can be stabilised and turned around.

Our economy is in fairly good shape and with prudent management can get better but there is less cash around now and government must cut its cloth to suit its pocket. As part of this I offer the following: I firmly believe that this council MUST initiate a review of the whole government.

What I want is for councillors and NOT the administration to sit down and review the FIG machine from TOP to BOTTOM, not the other way around as always happens. With a bottom up review it is normally the workers who get laid off whilst the fat cats who cost the real money stay in place. If I have my way that isn't going to happen this time.

As part of the review that I have in mind, I would like to go through each and every contract post that we have, from the chief executive down and including these new fangled super heads, eliminate those posts that we can do without. Those that we deem necessary should then be scrutinised to see just how quick we can have a local in place, where we can. This isn't going to be a quick process; it may mean that we will have people understudying post holders for some time, but if that is what is required then so be it. It will mean that instead of just advertising jobs and seeing what turns up we will have to be aggressive in our search for the right people. This is not contactor bashing. I have nothing against the people that are here. They are on the whole doing very well. They did not force themselves on us, they answered advertisements that we

placed. The fault lies squarely with us.

want to see any organisation that receives public money have their personnel structure scrutinised and a firm plan put in place for localising any posts that may be held by persons on contract or subject to work permits before any public funds are handed over.

Employment issues:

We seem to have a situation developing whereby young local people (and the not so young) are finding it hard to get work. I promise that I will strive tirelessly to find openings for our people

> We also need a thriving private sector, Good employers have nothing to fear from me. I want you to prosper so that you can pass on a fair percentage of your profits to those who work for you. I will not however look so kindly upon those who may want to turn a fast buck at the expense of our people or our country.

> One area that MUST be looked at as a matter of urgency is how jobs are advertised. I hear adverts on the radio that would seem to be intended for the renewal of a work permit, or someone from outside who would require one, and are worded in such a way that there is no way that a local can get at them. This has to be stopped. If, for example, it really needs someone with 5 years experience for a particular job then the company or business should be asked to start actively training a local person

and the issuing of a work permit be made dependant upon that happening. I really do look forward to getting my teeth into this subject, should I be elected.

The working conditions and ill treatment of migrant workers in the Islands is also something that our government must be duty bound to investigate. Reports keep surfacing about maltreatment, such as workers being too scared to book a hospital appointment if they feel unwell as it will, I presume, cost the employer if treatment is required, and they are threatened with dismissal should they do so. Also long hours and low pay keep coming up; workers are warned off talking to anyone on pain of being dismissed. Is this really the type of society in which we can feel proud of living?

Whilst I support camp and feel that we have a duty to fully support our people in the agricultural sector we may have to revisit just how we do this. As things stand I would NOT look favourably upon any further advances from the abattoir for public funds. It is time it stood on its own two feet. It is also probably time we produced an exit strategy.

Oil:

Although we must continue to prepare ourselves for the moment that a hydrocarbon industry may happen, we must not allow ourselves to become fixated on the possibility. If it is going to happen then this will require you to make some far reaching and wise decisions for your government to implement. These are your islands and

it is only right and proper that you are provided with all the information possible to say what level of impact that you want the industry to have.

One major project that will probably be started during this council is the building of the deep water facility. It is something that I think is required. We may have to stage it over a couple of years. The final decision again must

be taken by you as to whether it will go ahead. If it does then I will certainly be pressurising for the maximum possible local involvement in its construction.

On the whole, at the grass roots level the FIG has a really good team of people who are working for it, doing the best that they can within the guidelines given to them

There must be a continued programme of building social housing, there is always going to be a need also a rolling programme of providing building plots at affordable prices. Apart from plots for commercial use, I do not support the offering of building plots on an auction basis.

I would like to take another look at the child allowance payments. I have no intention of lowering them but rather would like to see what the qualifying criterion is.

l am a firm believer in keeping hold of our traditions and forming a national identity. have no wish to become a mini England or a mini anywhere else for that matter. I am more than happy to adopt an idea that is beneficial to us from anywhere in the world but am getting somewhat fed up with us having things foisted on us just because someone thinks it's

good for us. We should be the judge of that. I am actually proud of the few differences that we are still allowed to have with the rest of the world. Hang on to them, cherish them, and build on





There is no one answer. One point that I would like to make is that part of the future of the Camp is in the ability of Stanley people to visit and buy property outside of the town. This will, in my mind, give

This will, in my mind, give people a stake in the future and development of the Camp.

I also believe that the constituency question is important.

The camp has 262 voters returning 3 members. The Stanley constituency has over 1300 voters returning 5 members.

It is unbalanced, unfair and in my opinion it has to change. The last referendum was closer

than some people would have you believe.

If elected, I shall put forward that there should be a referendum to be organised before the midterm of the next Assembly.

A two thirds majority in favour is required for any change. The camp has nothing to fear

from one constituency, in fact, I believe the camp would have a lot to gain from such a change.



For better Camp and Stanley balance 1 would support the following if elected :

 Equal representation, which is a basic requirement for any democracy and could be achieved by having one constituency and everyone having the same number of votes. Electors would have a greater choice of candidates and equal input.

 Resume holding some meetings in camp attended by all assembly members.

Recognition that the artificial separation by splitting such a small country is divisive. The last several councils had a majority of Stanley members but huge support has been directed at sustaining and developing rural businesses.

ing rural businesses. Continuing conditional support for the abattoir for the same reason that I voted for it initially. I would prefer to see subsidies linked to production rather than simply supporting a lifestyle no longer viable for some. Farmers need to be given time to consolidate new breeding programmes to provide the volume and quality required. Recognition that vulnerable

Recognition that vulnerable groups in Stanley are not always receiving consistent support. Restoration of children's allowance to all would be a good start. It could be made taxable so that low income families receive maximum benefit.

When the population was equally distributed between Stanley and Camp in years gone by, then the case for two constituencies was probably stronger, but today if you play the numbers game, in order to for there to be proper proportional representation, you would have 1 Member for Camp and 7 for Stanley. Personally I think to change

Personally I think to change in this way would be wrong, and would only serve to further promote Camp as an isolated community.

A single constituency with an appropriate voting system so Camp is not marginalised would seem to be the best option. Camp and Stanley are the

Falkland Islands, the continual segregation of the two only serves to cause bitterness on a number of levels.

Camp must also be treated like a business and not like a poor relation.

Of course there will always be a need for rural policies but they can exist under the umbrella of the Falkland Islands, rather than being segregated off and made to be easy targets.

On front page Penguin News Friday, October 16, 2009. Headlines: Half the population to decide our future.

Who is at fault that so few are entitled to vote? Is it Immigration Rules or the Constitution? Numbers published V21.No 22 states a total of 1584 people are registered on the electoral roll. 1322 for Stanley and 262 for camp.

Eight Elected give a representation of 198 per Member overall. Divide 1322 by 5 for Stanley and the figure is 246.4 per Member Elected. For Canp 262 divided by 3 gives 87.3 voters per Member. When expressed as percentage representation the picture for Camp is satisfactory given the thin population scattered over a wide area, especially when communication lines are often down.

If the question was about numbers, I am happy with the status quo as it is. The camp population is depressed enough, so they don't need added pressure by reducing their direct representation, as suggest by some.

It is not solely the balance between Camp and Stanley that it is important, but also the increasing differences between distinct areas of Camp that need to be taken into account. The Islands are not connected to the road network and therefore will always require effective and affordable aviation and shipping services. On the mainland, the impact of land distribution and talling wool prices has led to an economic downturn and increasing de-population. There is a strong argument for strategic thinking in terms of a second population centre on the West: a small community will help remove the increasing social isolation and help to provide better economies of scale, as well as an alternative place of residence for people living in Stanley. Any rural development is likely

Any rural development is likely to require investment (either government or private) and therefore strategies that might arise out of the RDS will need to be sustainable and economically attractive. Key aspects of both current and future development are access to good, robust, communications including roads, telecommunications, affordable and manageable freight and aviation services, radio and television. These are, and will be, essential to ensure the long-term viability of Camp and better parity within the Islands.

 With more newcomers/ visitors to the islands a better understanding of and respect for the FI Country Code is needed plus restraint of dogs in our sheep farming environment.



It concerns me that after sixty years we may have to remove the word Service from FIGAS and replace it with Company. An affordable and efficient

An alfordable and efficient transport system throughout the islands is beneficial to those living in Camp and Stanley, and also tourists.

It should be easier to acquire mortgages and loans. Presently it is extremely difficult to obtain either if you live in the Camp for purchasing land or beginning a new business venture.

An area that is sometimes overlooked in the rural community is the well being of the elderly and disabled who do not wish to move to Stanley. Assistance should be given to those who wish to live in camp for as long as possible, with carers being provided if necessary.

We must move more vigorously towards promoting from within. Falkland Islands Government departmental posts when possible should be filled by Falkland Islanders as part of our right to run our own country.


There is a huge wish list when we think of things we would like to enhance Falkland life however in the current financial climate it is not only about capital cost but also the running cost of some of these projects.

It would be great to have a cinema, bowling alley and a place where younger members of the community could meet, all housed in one building.



Elevating issues: what areas of Falklands life deserve more attention?



There is a tendency to focus on the Standard of Living and all the inherent over Regulation which

innerent over Regulation which seems to come with it. By doing so, we tend to loose sight, of Our Unique, Quality of Life. Housing There is a desperate shortage of housing in Stanley. Government must build housing suitable for both married and single persons, together with purpose built units for our Senior Citizens.

Government must also, return to providing, Serviced Plots of Land, at realistic prices, to enable our young to access the housing ladder. This would also end the current unsightly trend of high density building. The current child benefit

scheme is not fit for purpose.

Unemployment at the moment stands at 27 many of whom are young folk. Work Permits currently in

circulation, in Stanley alone, number 366 Full Time & 43 Part Time

With the current economic situation, and the freeze, on Civil Service Salaries.and Old Age Pensions.

It would seem wholly inappropriate for Councillors Forming the next Legislature to receive any increase In their Allowances until our economy recovers.

Concerning allowances, I would have. All expenses of Government officials, published monthly

I believe that the less able and vulnerable members of society need to be taken more into This starts with account. accessibility to public buildings and commercial establishments. In fact, anyone who has attempted to manoeuvre a pushchair around the town will appreciate some of the difficulties of access.

The obvious social centre for Stanley is the Town Hall which badly needs a lift. For the Camp, why not a fund that clubs and organisations can tap into to improve their social life?

Another area of concern is housing. We need 20 to 25 serviced plots each year. I support the development of new plots outside central Stanley. I would press for serious and practical ways of helping genuine first-time buyers e.g. a discount scheme to assist them in taking the first step on the housing ladder. Surely housing has to be seen as a real investment in the future? believe it is time to reconsider the sale of older Government properties to sitting tenants, who should also be eligible for discounts - this was done some years ago and was very successful. Clearly the monies raised from the sale of these properties should be re-invested into new Government homes



Additional issues if elected:

- Maintaining standards in public life through clear declarations of interest before elections and whenever appropriate. Mine are in my manifesto.

In the interests of transparency assembly members expenses claims should be published annually, in the same way as their allowances. Sales of land to non-residents

worry many because of the potential to return to the situation where overseas landlords were bleeding the economy and not reinvesting profits. Progressed too far it could be used to attempt to undermine our case for self determination. The legislation should be reviewed.

An important question has arisen regarding mine clearance, the planning permissions contained conditions relating to environmental mitigation and a representative of the British government confirms that this should happen. However, it appears that the contractors' budget does not make any such provision. This must be clarified and resolved before work starts because these are the trials that will set the standard for any future work.

I would propose that student funding is only treated as a loan if the individual does not return to contribute their skills within an agreed time - the time to vary with the years experience needed in different fields.

All three looked to be enjoying themselves but it was James Tyrell who most wanted the win, with Ieuan coming in second. More riders are required for this race, so come on, there must be more Pee Wees out there. It's a great day out for all the family



Stephen Clifton, New Zealand's number one archer World class archer

THE son of a Falkland Islander is breaking records in the world of archery in New Zealand and has his sights set on a gold medal at next year's Commonwealth Games in Delhi.

Stephen Clifton, the son of Barry Clifton who emigrated many years ago, last month won bronze at the world archery championship, becoming the first New Zealander to win an individual medal at that level.

Ranked seventh in the World, Stephen is one of only five Commonwealth shooters in the world's top 30 and has been new Zealand's top ranked archer for five years. If he is successful at an event in Australia this month, his ranking could rise to third or fourth.

Stephen said he sees himself as "at least medalling" at the Commonwealth Games and has received funding from a government agency so he can travel to competitions overseas in preparation for the event.

He got into the sport through his uncle who took him hunting for deer and goat in the forests from the time he was eight years old.







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Election night fireworks herald all new Assembly

FIREWORKS echoed around Stanley last night as the election results were announced - and it proved to be an explosive night as a clean sweep of eight new memhers were elected to the Legislative Assembly

Gasps echoed around the Town Hall as the Camp constituency was the first to welcome three new faces.

Only one vote separated the winning trifecta of Roger Edwards, Sharon Halford and Bill Luxton.

lan Hansen, who raced home at the last election with 30 per cent of the vote, saw his share slump to 14.6 per cent. He was closest runner-up, and former councillor Richard Stevens saw his vote tumble from 121 to 39.

But if the Camp figures reflected dissatisfaction with the sitting members, the result in Stanley was astounding - with five more newcomers completing a remarkable whitewash - possibly for the first time in Falklands history

Dick Sawle romped home with 17.7 per cent of the count - 180 votes clear of second placed Gavin Short, who himself was 99 votes ahead of his nearest rival. Both claimed a larger share of the vote than any of their immediate predecessors.

Glenn Ross, Emma Edwards and Jan Cheek completed the overhaul of the Legislative Assembly, with Mrs Cheek edging out Mike Summers by 50 votes.

Cheers and hugs filled the hall as the new councillors drank in the atmosphere and began to realise the enormity of their efforts. In one fell swoop - and with a record turnout - the Falklands had voted for change in the most dramatic fashion.

Dick Sawle was "absolutely and totally delighted" with his tally: "I feel very humbled and very honoured," he said. "It's a massive privilege. I don't quite know [how the next four years will be]. I think it's going to be

quite complicated and never easy. But these sort of things have never put me off.'

Gavin Short was quite taken aback by the result: "Watching the online poll I thought it was fun, but never thought it would end up that way. People have voted for change and by God it's up to us to deliver."

An emotional Glenn Ross said: "I am just thrilled to bits really. For me the people of the Falklands have spoken, and this council will be one that listens."

Emma Edwards said: "I'm scared at the job ahead of me, but delighted to have been given the public vote. I think there's going to be a lot of hard work, but also exciting. I am really looking forward to starting on Friday moming.'

Jan Cheek thanked those who had voted for her: "I will try to justify your faith in me." She said she was looking forward to what would be a busy and difficult period, adding: "I have the time now to give it my full attention."

Outgoing councillor John Bir-mingham said: "I wish the next council all the very best, and I am sure the new council will find the next four years very interesting."

Janet Robertson said she did not think complete change was

for the better, particularly over the next four years when experience would have been an advantage.

Camp frontrunner Roger Edwards was "absolutely chuffed" with his result. "I'd like to thank those who voted for me. It's obvious that people wanted change, and that's why we had such a high turnout. It meant people were prepared to go out of their way and vote for change."

He said a total change in council "could well mean we would have the hardest six months work a council has ever put in.

A surprised Bill Luxton, celebrating at his farm in West Falkland, said he felt gratified but also humbled: "With everything I laid on the line I really didn't expect it to go that way."

He said the reorganisation of government and the Chief Executive's role were tasks for the immediate future: "The Chief Executive is an extraordinarily unpopular figure with both the civil serv-ice and the public."

Sharon Halford, who served two terms as a Stanley councillor from 1993-2001, said she was "very pleased" with the result, but warned of tough times ahead: "I think it's going to be difficult for everybody. It's going to be very hard work."

She thanked people for making the effort to vote, and set herself a target to lift the morale of the country: "What I'd really like to do is put the feelgood factor back into the Falklands, so people can feel appreciated and needed, rather than tolerated, because after all, this is our home."

Friday, November 6, 2009

The turnout of 1232 was a record for both Stanley and Camp, with 77.7 per cent of the electorate going to the polls. Almost nine out of ten Camp residents voted, with three quarters of Stanley voters making their voices heard.

The Camp turnout of 234 was 89.3 per cent, up from 86 per cent in 2005 and 82.2 per cent in 2001. The Stanley turnout of 998 was 75.6 per cent, also up on the previous two election figures of 69 per cent and 68.7 per cent respectively

WAITING for the outcome of an election can almost be likened to waiting for the birth of a baby - well before these new-fangled scan things arrived, that is - that excitement of not having an inkling of what's about to land in your lap.

So now we have a completely new Assembly, some of whom have very strong views on a number of subjects and who will no doubt bring more rapid change. Or at least I would expect so, seeing as how the previous Assembly's four year's work has been mooted as less than adequate in the eyes of most candidates, as well as much of the public.

And so we enter a new era of more transparency, open decision making and debate, not to mention the Chief Executive being hauled over the coals if the election campaign chest-beating is followed through. There are interesting times ahead, and it's the sort of stuff that newspapers thrive on.

Shocked, appalled, hopeful or just plain excited about the outcome of the 2009 General Election, there is no doubt that there is a very interesting four years ahead for all of us.

It's going to be a very sharp learning curve for the less experienced, and the pressures are going to be immense. When the going gets tough let's hope they all manage to hang on in there, but for those who enjoy a little flutter, a by-election might be worth running a book on...

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Top brass under fire over port site shortlisting

GOVERNMENT top management came under fire at the final candidates' question time at the Chamber of Commerce on Monday night, after former councillors denied they had shortlisted Stanley Harbour and Port Harriet as possible sites for a new port.

At an earlier Stakeholders Group meeting, Government Major Projects Director Ken Johnson said the former Legislative Assembly made the shortlist for a new deep water port. The choice met firm opposition from group members who queried the basis on which the previous council had made the selection. Stakeholder Captain Stephen Clifton said master mariners had not been properly consulted and that the decision should be reversed.

At Monday's Chamber of Commerce session with election candidates, the site shortlist was again met with opposition from the public. It was agreed, however, that there was a need to keep the list short so that a business case could be progressed.

Royal Haskoning, a worldwide firm of consultants, architects and engineers, has been appointed to provide professional advice in the three key areas of business planning, technical evaluation and cost estimating, to provide Executive Council with sufficient information from which to select a preferred option for the new port.



ART enthusiasts enjoyed a display of 21 water colours by local artist Richard Cockwell at the Malvina House Hotel on Sunday.


The event was an opportunity for Malvina to showcase the works they had commissioned for new rooms in the extension, currently under construction.

Long road to recovery for stallion Thyer

THE Stanley Sports Association (SSA) stallion has suffered a leg injury and the road to recovery is proving to be a long and uncomfortable one.

Son of the triple-crown winner Nijinsky, and coming up to 20 years of age, Thyer was given to the SSA in 1992 by Sheik Maktoum of Dubai to improve the bloodstock of racehorses in the Islands. Thyer had taken a second and a fourth in races but never made it to the Derby.

Owen Summers, who has cared for the stallion ever since his arrival in the Falklands, is hopeful he will make a full recovery: "I'd really miss him if he went," he said. Senior Veterinary Officer Steve

Forces pressure

BRITAIN faces a "ticking timebomb" of emotional, pychological and financial problems among children whose parents have served in the armed forces, according to a report from the Royal Navy and Royal Marines Children's Fund. The report calls for more research into the issue, and said some families were still suffering effects from service in the Falklands War. The charity estimates there are just under 175,000 children with parents currently in the armed forces.

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Youngest candidate wins seat

But memories of the testosterone-drenched, cut-and-thrust debates, the filthy rumour peddling and the absurd promises will still be vivid as the first day of the new Legislative Assembly dawns.

You mean it wasn't like that? Well, sorry, but that's how election campaigns and their aftermath are here in the UK, and in pretty much every other country where there is vibrant democracy, including the colonies. But - as you are, no doubt, saying - the Falklands are different. We're little, and far more gentle and polite.


True. Rarely does a rude word pass between Falklands politicos as they amble, rather than run, for office.

Citizens of some other countries would be grateful for such a sleepy but safe system. They have to put up with corrupt pantomimes that are jokingly called elections. Afghanis, whom 1 know a little both from the exiled community in London and from my one visit to the country, are such people.

Their recent brave effort was a waste of time and lives. Our soldiers died to ensure Afghanis could vote in relative safety, and yet the government manipulated the polls.

But, as long as everyone plays by the rules, some election excitement is good; even fun. I well remember the election night party of 1997, the climax of which was seeing the great fall from power of Michael Portillo.

I believe that through my telescope I detected some refreshing movement among the campaigns in Stanley. Mr Short and Mrs Clausen showed the initiative to buy some space in the Penguin News and gave us a good read. Others, though, could not be bothered to answer the questions that PN put them in its fair Q&A pages. Perhaps a contender can campaign ef-



fectively over a drink in the Globe or the Rose. But out of sheer respect for the hard-won freedom to vote, I do think candidates should put maximum effort into their campaigns.

If the election itself is a snore, then one can be expected to snooze through the next four years.

Danger lurks in Texas Tea

AUSTRALIANS are probably becoming painfully aware that there is an unpleasant flip side to the oil-prosperity coin.

An offshore well has been leaking vast amounts of crude from the sea bed. To crown the disaster, efforts to stop the leak have now caused the rig to burst into flames.

Let's cut to the chase here. The question is whether this could happen should oil exploration go ahead off the Falklands.

The answer is yes. And if it happened, the environmental impact could be huge.

I say this because, frankly, no one else appears to be saying it – not even, as far as I can tell – the conservationists. Please do correct me if I am wrong. I would love to kick off a PN debate.

I recall a Falklands Conservation AGM in London some years ago at which an oil expert spoke, deriding the idea that the exploitation of Texas Tea could pose a major threat to wildlife.

Extraction, he explained, would take place far offshore, and even if there was a spill it would not reach the Falklands beaches. This struck me as a weak argument. Even if oil was dispersed by wind and tide before it hit the coast, would it not kill sea life? And do penguins, albatross, pryons and storm petrels not travel hundreds of miles out to sea in search of food, even when they are raising chicks?

I wonder if we have been asking the right questions. Do we only fear the classic scenario of treaclelike oil clogging the feathers of dying birds on beaches? If that is so, we can be slightly reassured.

But another, more likely, worse case scenario is being played out off Australia. That disaster should be shaping our questions.

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UK media says soldier fighting for his life

THE UK media says last week's shooting incident which hospitalised three servicemen was caused by automatic fire.

The most seriously wounded of the three is being treated at the Royal Centre for Defence Medicine at Selly Oak in Birmingham.

According to The Scotsman, he was in a "very serious" condi-tion, and fighting for his life. Two other soldiers from the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, 5th Battalion The Royal Regiment of Scotland, were also wounded in the incident, late last Tuesday night.

5 Scots is the current Resident Infantry Company in the Falklands, based in Canterbury and part of 16 Air Assault Brigade -one of the Army's premier military units. The incident is being investigated by the Special Investigation Branch of the Royal Military Police. The Daily Telegraph quoted a senior Army officer as saying: "There is no such thing as a range accident. Somebody is always at fault and it is not necessarily the person doing the shooting. Nothing is being ruled out at this stage but it does not appear to be a case of deliberate wounding.

The Daily Mirror said the troops were believed to have been hit by "machine gun fire," while on a live training exercise at Onion Range. It quoted an Army source as saying: "At the moment it's looking like an unfortunate accident.



Anyone in the business will be able to tell you that you cannot run the same amount of breeding ewes as wool producing wethers due to higher feed demands.

In my opinion FIRS, Penguin News and potential councillors have not taken the time to ask the people who are currently working very hard to make a living from the agricultural business, what the issues are that they are facing.

Geriatric sheep left to farmers

I AGREE we need an abattoir but at what cost? Farms need to have at the very least 100 per cent lambing to maintain sheep numbers on farm and to support an abattoir which needs to slaughter 80-100,000 thousand animals per annum to be viable.

The original idea when planning for the above was to have an abattoir that could process all the cast sheep, as most of these animals were killed and dumped on fields or over cliffs. But a huge uturn has to be taken now that FIMCo wants your prime young stock (but not at film star prices) therefore leaving the majority of the meat producing farmers with geriatric animals as well as those that don't make the weights. In other words, the rubbish.

Whilst it might seem a good idea to those people who don't farm, that farmers can change their wether camps into breeding grounds, there is evidence still in Camp of old pens left to rot because it didn't work then and it won't work now. Otherwise we would had all have done it.

Our wethers, when shorn, contribute to the largest income per head and have done so since 1980. Then, we were told several years ago, no more subsidy, sink or swim! If the abattoir was supposed to help us, then it hasn't.

If the subsidy that is paid into FIMCo was paid to the majority of the small farming community on wool production pro rata, we'd all be better off and able to survive.

The majority of the subsidy paid to FIMCo ends up between Falklands Landholdings (FLH) and high paid employees, plus imported overseas labour, and very little to the small farmer.

NB: as a farmer I support FLH. They must continue in farming, be it meat or wool. The present managers should be left to manage, and the board of directors should be got rid of.

Maggie Goss Horse Shoe Bay On trial for torture

FORMER General Reynaldo Benito Bignone, who ruled Argentina from June 1982 until the nation's return to democracy in December 1983, stands accused of torturing 56 people, depriving them of their liberty, as well as committing illegal searches, federal court papers say.

Also facing the same charges are former intelligence chief Fernando Ezequiel Verplaetsen and ex-military officials Santiago Omar Riveros, Eugenio Guanabens Perello, Carlos Alberto Tepedino and German A Montenegro.

The alleged crimes occurred at the Campo de Mayo, Buenos Aires, the main torture center during the 1976-83 dictatorship, the court papers say.

Anywhere from 10,000 to 30,000 dissidents, students, labor leaders, intellectuals and leftists who ran foul of the dictatorship because of their political views disappeared or were held in secret jails and torture centres during the eightyear "Dirty War."

About 130 witnesses, many of them survivors from Campo de Mayo, will testify in a trial expected to last until March 2010, the court said.

Argentine authorities also recently announced the arrests of two men accused of piloting "death flights," from which more than 1,000 drugged and blindfolded prisoners were hurled to their deaths in the Atlantic Ocean or the Rio Plata.

Eight out of ten applications given the green light

THE open session of the Planning and Building committee was relatively short and dealt with just ten new applications for planning permission, eight of which were approved with conditions, one refused and one deferred to another meeting.

Detailed planning permission was granted for the following developments: a single-storey dwelling at 30 Hansen Hill for Kevin Marsh: a garage with toilet at 5 Gleadell Close for Jay Moffatt: Carl and Diane Freeman's proposed creation of hard-standing and dredging works at Maiden Haven on Moody Brook Road; a single-storey dwelling at 13 Sulivan Street for Stephen and Rose Toolan; Julie Halliday's proposed extension of her existing studio with re-cladding and re-roof-ing at Studio 52 on Dean Street; and Byron Holdings' plans for the construction of office accommodation, with the creation of a container lay-down area and car park with fence erection and a bund at 33 Coastel Road.

Similar consent was given to the Falkland Islands Tourist Board for the erection of a "bus shelter" at the Gypsy Cove car park.

Concerns had been raised that it might intrude into the already much used car park.

But members were advised that it would in fact be located

outside the stone-covered parking area. Outline planning permission for a dwelling on land to the rear of 74 Davis Street for Edward Neilson was also granted.

An application for permission in principle for the erection of four semi-detached dwellings following the removal of an existing house at 5 Davis Street East, which was submitted by Byron Holdings Limited, was the subject of one letter of objection.

This was considered, as was the recommendation of the Environmental Planning Officer, and the committee decided to refuse consent on the grounds of overdevelopment.

Byron Holdings Limited also sought approval for the extension and modification to the existing office building at Byron House located at 3 H Jones Road.

Here there were concerns over the need to improve car-parking, and it was resolved to defer a decision to allow discussions to take place.

Committee members then reviewed a list of 31 applications for building permits and noted the progress being made towards the grant of such consents.

The date of the next meeting of the committee was set for December 3, commencing at 8.30am in the Liberation Room.

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October warmer and wetter than average

OCTOBER had average temperatures and above average rainfall for the month. Sunshine totals were above average.

Temperature

The mean maximum temperature was 10.6 Celsius, exactly the same as the long-term average for October. The highest temperature recorded was 16.3 Celsius on the 21st. The lowest maximum was 4.8 Celsius on the 24th. The mean minimum temperature was 2.1 Celsius, which is just below the 2.5 Celsius October average. The lowest minimum was -1.7 Celsius on the 25th and the highest minimum was 6.4 Celsius recorded on the 1st October. Rainfall

The total rainfall for the month was 44.2 mm which is above the average for October of 34.8 mm. The wettest day was the 13th with a total of 6.2 mm. More than 0.1 mm fell on 18 days and 1 mm or more fell on 13 days.

Sunshine

There was 231.4 hours of sunshine, which is above the monthly average of 181.8 hours. The highest daily total was 13.1 hours on the 27th.

Snow

There were 11 days when sleet or snow fell and one day when snow was reported lying. There were no days of thunder. There was one day with fog, and hail fell on seven days, above the normal of five days.

Wind/Gales

The monthly mean wind speed was 16.2 knots, which is just above the average for October of 15.9 knots. The highest hourly mean speed of 39 knots occurred on the 9th. The highest recorded gust was 58 knots, and this occurred on the 27th. There were 18 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots, matching the average for the month. Eight gale days were recorded, which is below the monthly average of six.

How I survived my first two-nighter: up hill, down dale... and at the Club

After four months in the Islands I figured it was about time I experienced one of the great Falklands traditions. It's my first twonighter, and I think it deserves to be recorded from a newcomer's perspective. At least as best as I can recall it, anyway...

Friday

THE ferrymen flick on the speakers as we disembark at Port Howard and the country strains of "we're going to Jackson" reverberates through the crystal clear air. I'm travelling with Shirley Knight, and the

52-mile drive to Fox Bay is something of an education. The back of her car is piled to the roof with polystyrene boxes full of frozen food for the shearing gangs.

We find ourselves tailing an artic. It's trailing a plume of fine dust and Shirley is less than impressed: "The problem with drivers on the West is they don't use their mirrors," she says.

Her frustration steadily builds for the next couple of miles, until we reach Little Chartres bridge and the artic pulls over to let us pass. We cross the river and it appears the truck driver has caught Shirley's attention. It's Justin. Her son.

We clamber out of our seats and stretch our legs. "It's a beautiful spot," says Shirley, understating the obvious. "Not bad having a trout stream on your doorstep."

Justin hands me a beer and I suggest it might be a little early for a drink. He scoffs at such an impertinent remark, so I crack open my first tinnie on the West. When I tell Shirley I'm writing an article,

she doesn't seem too unperturbed. But she is characteristically unequivocal when it comes to any references I make to her: "If you misquote me, I'll send you a turd in a jiffy bag," she warns me.

Keith Knight is hosting one of the home bars in town. It's a cooperative cash-free zone, where guests tuck in to food and drink at the host's house which, of course, is supplemented by generous donations from the guests themselves.

Keith's living room is adorned with flags on one side (two Falklands, one Union) and a blank TV screen on the other, surrounded by stacks of DVDs. It's the only small screen entertainment available on the West since the transmitter gave up the ghost.

Lisa and Nuala - Justin and Keith's partners - are the only girls here at the moment, and the conversation predictably revolves around farm equipment and freight prices, much to their chagrin.

It doesn't help Nuala's street cred when one of the boys asks her why she was using channel 100 on the car radio to chat with fellow travellers en route: "Because that's

what they told me," she says. "But we were only joking," says another. Unbeknown to Nuala, she was broadcasting ner conversations on the channel reserved for the FIGAS pilots and air traffic. controllers.

Back at Justin's, where I'm spending the night, more mattresses are being offloaded into the upstairs room: seven at the last count. It could be a bit of a squeeze later on.

and not the type I prefer. Justin lays on a hearty meal of ribs and veg to sustain us for the night ahead, and pretty much the whole settlement seems to appear at the Club at one stage or another during the next four or five hours. It's the sort of gathering that happens in

so many places on a Friday night, but there's something special about the characters that inhabit these parts.

When it's time to pull up stumps, the stroll from Club to crib is no more than 200 yards. I'm a little surprised when I discover later someone got lost along the same path at roughly the same time – in their 4WD.

Saturday

I JOIN a motley crew of 30-odd revellers, eager to get underway for the event of the day: a rally of more than a dozen 4WDs across peat bogs and streams, and up slithering slopes to the summit of Mount Philomel. In Falklands parlance, we're about to go shit-tracking.

"How the hell are we going to get up there?" I think to myself. It's one of the highest summits in the country, and the sight of a string of 4WDs clinging to its slopes is an off-roader's delight.

As we approach the final few hundred yards - the steepest and trickiest of the whole ascent - Justin is imparting all the expertise he has learned from the frequent forays he has made across these hills over the years. And when we get to the top there's a squeal of delight – because it's been Lisa behind the wheel for the trickiest part of the track.

The view from the peak is simply stunning. Little Chartres is but a pinprick way below and, at an elevation of 2100 feet, the sweeping hills of this part of West Falkland sit like mighty green-grey giants, brooding over the rivers and plains at their

feet. I catch my breath, as do we all, and admire the view.

During our descent we stop just above the north west ridge, a 900-feet high arm pointing towards Christmas Harbour. Chartres estuary is spread out before us, Mount Adam dominates the western skyline and the Shag Cove Mountains draw a wriggly line over the horizon to the East.

Further down, one of the young girls ahead of us leaps out to snatch a couple of freshly laid goose eggs, and the youngest of them all – five-year-old daughter Kia Alazia – grins broadly as she holds open the last of the wire gates before we reach our barbecue spot by a gently lapping stream.

Keith Knight makes his approach to the barbecue grounds in typically cavalier fashion, twisting the track rod of his Land Rover as he dives over a bank. A spot of bush mechanics soon has the wheels facing in the right direction.

The strains of "we're going to Jackson" again echo around the gully as three dozen hungry trekkers tuck into what seems like an endless feast.

Half a dozen youngsters play around the stream, and families and friends mingle through the afternoon. All in all, it's guite an exquisite country collective.

By Spm we're on the 20-mile drive back to Justin's, where four of the boys head upstairs to crash out on their mattresses. These young 'uns clearly haven't paced themselves too well: for them the twonighter has already become a two-napper.

My second night at the Club is another great opportunity for me to put faces to names I already know

Towards the end of the evening, Keith Knight, Keith Alazia and Harold Nielsen are the three stooges behind the bar.

One takes a glass, another pours it, and the third takes the money. Even though some of the drinks don't quite make it back to the customer.

Rodney Lee and Nigel Knight are the two senior stooges propping up the other side of the bar, and their repartie is as sharp as a tack, every phrase a self-deprecating demonstration of masterful mockery. It's a wonderfully entertaining evening, thanks to our Wester hosts.

Sunday BREAKFAST is soon followed by bucks fizz all descend on the house. It's Lisa's pre-birthday celebration, and we're not going anywhere until she's donned the obligatory tiara and completed her treasure hunt.

When we board our 4WDs for a rumble across the Camp for a demonstration of peat cutting, some are still clutching their

plastic champagne goblets. It's a public holiday tomorrow - Peat Cutting Monday – and a number of townies are encouraged to grab a spade and slice a few sods out of the ground, upholding an age-old Falklands tradition, since usurped by kero and diesel heating.


The sodden peat becomes heavier the closer it is to the water table but, despite the aching limbs, Jake Riddell puts in a great effort for the teenagers and Pippa Christie puts in a spectacular effort for the girls.

From here, it's time for our third barbecue in 24 hours, in a sheltered spot on Ben and Clare Cockwell's property. And there's plenty more meat to keep Ben busy at the makeshift grill, this time in the shape of an old oil drum. Sadly for me, though, my weekend is drawing to a close, because I need to return to work.

I'm on the late flight back to Stanley and, as the pilot dips his wings over the barbecue crowd, I farewell a whole clutch of distant figures below.

It's not their names that matter as much as their mateship. And I'm grateful to have been invited along for the ride.



Now, researchers reporting in the November issue of Current Biology have compared DNA from four of the world's dozen or so known Falklands wolf museum specimens to that of living canids, offering new insight into the evolutionary ancesiry of these enigmatic carnivores.

"One of the big draws for an evolutionary biologist is that this species had a big influence on Darwin's ideas about how species evolve," said Graham Slater of the University of California. Los Angeles, noting that Darwin recognised differences between the East Falkland and West Falkland wolves as evidence that species were not fixed entities.

But the wolves' circumstances were also just downright puzzling.

"It's really strange that the only native manimal on an island would be a large canid," Mr Slater said.

"There are no other native terrestrial mammals - not even a mouse. It's even stranger when

you consider that the Falklands are some 480 kilometers from the South American mainland. The question is, how did they get there?"

Ultimately, the Falklands wolf died out because it was perceived as a threat to settlers and their sheep, although fur traders took out a lot of the population as well.

Biologists have also puzzled over the Falklands wolf's ancestry.

It had been suggested that they were related to domestic dogs. North American coyotes, or South American foxes. Mr Slater said the wolves were the size of a coyote, but much stockier, with fur the color of a red fox. They had short muzzles, just like grey wolves, and thick, woolly fur.

Mr Slater's team now reports that the Falklands wolf's closest living relative is the maned wolf. The researchers also found that the four Falklands wolf samples they examined shared a common ancestor at least 70.000 years ago, which suggests they arrived on the Islands before the end of the last ice age and before humans ever made it into the New World, ruling out the theory that Native Americans had imported them.

"The biggest surprise was that the divergence of the Falklands wolf from its closest living relative, the maned wolf, occurred over six million years ago." Slater said

"Canids don't show up in the South American fossil record until 2.5 million years ago, which means these lineages must have evolved in North America. The problem is that there are no good fossils that can be assigned to the Falklands wolf lineage in North America."

Given that maned and Falklands wolves split so long ago, there should be fossils of their close relatives in South America, Mr Slater said. And in fact, the researchers may have a candidate: a species from Patagonia called Dusicyon avus, which went extinct 6,000 to 8,000 years ago. Mr Slater says it's a possibility that study co-author Alan Cooper is now further investigating.



Fresh Assembly revert to old portfolio structures

THE wind of change is blowing gently through the ranks of the new Legislative Assembly with alterations to the portfolio and spokesperson system which were put in place by the previous Assembly.

The new Assembly has opted to revert to the pre 2005 system where members act as spokesperson alphabetically between monthly General Purpose Committees. However in the first instance Jan Check will take the chair until January 2010.

Throughout the previous council's term the spokesperson was always a member of Executive Council, and Mike Summers was elected for the role for most of the four years.

Portfolios were allocated by the new members over the weekend when they considered what areas they could best contribute to.

Councillor Dick Sawle, who received the most votes at last week's election and made his less than satisfied views on Cable and Wireless very clear thoughout his campaign, has responsibility for Post and Telecommunications as well as Monopolies (Cable and Wireless and Stanley Services Ltd). Councillor Bill Luxton, a fellow hardliner on telecomms in the Falklands, is the deputy portfolio holder in both areas.

Delivering his motion for adjournment speech at Tuesday's inaugural Legislative Assembly. Cllr Sawle said the framework that governed the two main monopolies had to be a priority of the Assembly. He said: "Any business that is given a monopoly has been given a massive privilege and must be carefully and critically scrutinised.

"In the unlikely event that a monopoly is found to be in our best interest then the government must ensure that people are receiving best value for money."

In the case of Cable and Wireless he said he remained profoundly sceptical that this was the case. "I believe there are other

far better long-term solutions. Those beliefs are one of my main reasons for standing in these elections." Members were unanimous in their agreement that he should take telecomms forward as one of his portfolio responsibilities, said ClIr Sawle.

A surprise portfolio for some was that of first time Councillor Glenn Ross, who has responsibility for Agriculture, Falkland Landholdings/Fox Bay and the Falkland Islands Meat Company.

Cllr Ross said a visit to the Department of Agriculture prior to the election had left him impressed with the people and the work being carried out, and he believed in time agriculture could return to being the main industry in the Islands.

"I'm expecting calls to tell me I don't know anything about agriculture, and I can honestly say that I know absolutely nothing about agriculture, but I am willing to learn," he told the Penguin News.

Cllr Ross said he intended to visit rural residents of both East and West Falkland as soon as possible. "I'd like to sit around the kitchen table, where the most productive meetings are held, and discuss the problems they face and the possible solutions," he said.

Cllr Ross is supported by Cllr Bill Luxton as deputy portfolio holder, a situation he said he was more than happy with.

When asked if there was any question of Camp councillors sidestepping issues important to their constituency, Cllr Ross assured that this was not the case.

Councillor Gavin Short has an extensive portfolio including Customs and Immigration, Fisheries, and Transport. Cllr Short used his motion for adjournment speech to thank his supporters and to ask the Chief Executive to put out an edict so that councillors could be addressed in good, old fashioned English.

He said at the briefings they had attended to date he had noticed the older hands tended to speak in English: "However, the new boys that are coming in speak some language that I'm afraid I do not understand and it goes over my head. "It's important that I understand, it's important that the public understands," he said, adding, "If I have to ask again, you might find that I am quite a cantankerous old goat at times."

Polling most votes from the Camp, Roger Edwards has been appointed as Chairman of Standing Finance Committee and also elected as a member of Executive Council.

He was not however enthralled with the way the election had been run. He said: "We must ensure that at the end of this particular Assembly the next election is not quite the shambles that we had in this one. Letters going out with the wrong dates on them, mix up over election expenses, no mobile polling stations and, to cap it all, Hill Cove and Port Howard only finding out about three days prior that they were to vote on Tuesday, 3rd November and not on Thursday the 5th of November."

Cllr Edwards said despite this there was an historically high turnout and all voters should be congratulated for their gallant effort. New Portfolios for all Assembly Members on page 3.

A MAN who arguably holds one of the highest honours that can be bestowed on them in the Islands: a key to the Falkland Club (aka the Glue Pot) and free drinks any time of the day or night for the rest of his life, has been observing the election process and results from afar.

Harold Briley sent regular reports to the people of the Falklands as the BBC's Latin American Correspondent during the 1982 war and was welcomed with a huge banner outside Government House saying, 'God Bless you Harold' on his first visit after the surrender.

'God Bless you Harold' on his first visit after the surrender. Mr Briley said the Falkland Islands General Election had been a boost to democracy, not just in the Islands but also more widely. In 60 years as a political journalist, covering many elections in the United Kingdom and around the world, he said he had never previously come across an election replacing the whole previous legislature.

His view as a political journalist with vast experience adds credence to the idea that once again the Falklands are unique and not a mere dot on the map attempting to imitate a distant land.

The recent election however appeared to receive little publicity or plaudits outside the Falkland Islands. Its success should have been publicised more widely in the UK and elsewhere, is the view of Mr Briley, who gave credit to Mercopress for providing a regular source of up-to-date news.

Look out in next week's Penguin News for more from Harold Briley whose annual report to the BBC, 13 weeks before the invasion, warned of Argentina's intention to recover the Islands by January 1983. He was told at the time, by a news editor at Broadcasting House, "We're not interested in Latin America." He's still got his finger firmly on the pulse and I for one will always be interested in what he has to say.

In the meantime, election fever has fizzled out rather quickly here, and it's nose to the grindstone for the new councillors.

Their task this week has been huge. As I studied the induction programme the hairs stood up on the back of my neck at the sheer volume of information being thrown at them in such short period. Can you imagine trying to take onboard the role and structure of the government, the administration, the Chief Executive, structure of committees, current key issues, the Island Plan and ongoing business... in two hours? Scary.

On the bright side, I recall enjoying the fresh questions and enquiries into the background of earlier decisions, as the previous council set forth in their new committees four years ago, and look forward to new issues and angles being explored with the new Assembly. Sharon Jaffray

Governor addresses the new Assembly

THE new Assembly took their Executive Council oaths in the drawing room of Government House on Friday, before His Excellency the Governor Alan Huckle addressed them on their new responsibilities.

"Under our new Constitution, you now carry - and have the democratic mandate to exercise - political responsibility for the internal government of the Islands.

"The days when Councillors could, as it were, criticise government from the sidelines are long gone," the Governor told the Assembly.

"Collective responsibility now rests firmly with you - and yours will not be a light or easy job. The tasks of government grow more complex and varied as our modernday society develops and becomes more sophisticated. You will need all your political skills to cope with the challenges ahead. Your collective political leadership will certainly be tested.

"You will, of course, need time to coalesce as a group and to determine your collective policies for the strategic direction of the Islands' government. You inherit from the previous Assembly a broad encompassed vision in the Islands' plan, but some issues will brook no delay. Amongst them will be the budget for the next financial year."

Mr Huckle spoke of the collapse of the flex fishery which had brought budget deficits, with further deficit predicted for this year. "As the various Green and White Papers issued by the previous Assembly have shown, we are beginning to live beyond our means," he said.

Agreement next year on an economic development strategy buttressed by a rural development strategy, with any consequential adjustments to the tax structure, will therefore be important, he said: "This is not a time for making policy commitments without considering carefully their budgetary implications."

He cautioned against reliance on future oil income with the possibility of the current oil exploration round being inconclusive.

"There is much to be done to protect and sustain the continued development of the Falkland Islands as a prosperous, forwardlooking society. You all bring, in different ways, considerable experience and skills to the task and I wish you every success, and know that you will merit the trust that has been placed in you by the electorate."

MP wishes councillors well with their future challenges

THE Minister of State for Europe and Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, Chris Bryant, has also wished the Assembly well for the challenges ahead.

Mr Bryant reaffirmed that the UK Government has absolutley no doubt about its sovereignity of the Falklands and reiterated the Foreign and Commonwealth's unconditional commitment to the right to self determination.

He said however, that without

conceding any ground on the sovereignty position "we should nevertheless look for opportunities to try and foster a constructive relationship with issues that are of mutual interest.

"The recent next of kin visits were an example of where we can work together with the Argentine Government. And the British Government will want to continue to work with Argentina on a range of international issues, not least within the G20 structures," said Mr Bryant.

Warm welcome given to Gurkha vet 27 years on

BELIEVED to be the first Gurkha to visit the Falklands as a veteran since 1982, Som Bahadur Bishwakarma left the Falklands today after an 11 day visit.

When recounting his experience of fighting on Mt William during the Falklands War, Som said the opposing force had already heard of the Gurkha's fierce reputation: "When we went there, the Argentines ran away, they knew the Gurkhas were coming," he told the Penguin News.

He fought with 1/7 Deo Gurkha Rifles as a Lance Corporal, and said he was proud to be a Gurkha: "For 200 years we've been working with the British Army.

Som said he would recommend that other Gurkhas visit the Falkland Islands: "Many are keen to come here. But they don't know how to," he said. Som's trip was funded by SAMA82.

Whilst here, Som was reunited with a friend he made after the surrender was announced. Carmen

November 27 will be a busy day for Stanley businesses with a visit from the grandly proportioned Veendam, although possi-





bly not as bustling as December 29 and February 5 when both the Star Princess and Norwegian Sun will anchor in Port William. The two have the capability of carrying 4602 passengers and 2118 crew between them.

A far smaller but brand new and rather more exclusive vessel, Plancius, is on her maiden voyage to the Falklands and due to arrive fully booked (110 passengers) at West Point on January 10, and at Carcass Island the following day.

Florian Piper, Director of Product Management of Oceanwide Expeditions who own Plancius, told the Penguin News: "Plancius is now freshly painted and alongside the dock in the Netherlands, While the ship has been waiting for final sea trials a team of builders has been giving the final touch to the interior of the vessel. The crew boarded at the end of October, and departure from the Netherlands is scheduled for early December in order to carry out the first Antarctic voyage.

Oceanwide Expeditions were recently awarded the World Travel Award 2009 in the category World's Leading Polar Expedition Operator. The presentation of this international prize took place during a spectacular gala performance in London, on Sunday 8 November.

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Oral historian visits the Falklands

RECENTLY arrived in the Islands. Oral History Archivist Maurice O'Keeffe is busy recording interviews with members of the Falklands community.

He hails from County Kerry, Ireland, and has spent the last 20 years recording people's life stories, he said: "Every person has a story to tell. I always focus on the person, it's their story."

His expertise lies in compiling collections which document the history of rural communities. He was nominated to record Falkland's stories by Professor Jim McAdam.

Maurice's visit is funded by

the Shackleton Fund and a radio auction organised by the Museum, and jointly sponsored and organised by the Museum and Archives.

Museum Manager Leona Roberts said: "The intention is that Maurice's interviews and the training that he will carry out will lay the groundwork for a long-running programme, which will ensure that many more memories and stories are saved for the future.

"The recording of Falkland Islanders' lives and experiences is tremendously important, and this is a project that the Museum and Archives have long wanted to get underway." Maurice said his work in Ireland would be impossible without the help of his wife Jane, who catalogues and indexes the material whilst he is out in the field. He also made particularly mention of Kay Meallum: "She is one hell of an organiser, and she's going to be a great contributor as well, because of her background," he said.

Towards the end of November Maurice O'Keeffe will be giving a workshop to anyone interested in learning the techniques and skills involved in oral history interviewing. All those interested in taking part are invited to contact the Museum or the Archives.

Cruisers get to work on a Carcass beach clean

PASSENGERS from the cruise ship Ushuaia spent a day with a difference on Carcass Island last week, when the final day of their South Georgia and Falkland Island trip turned into a beach clean.

The cruise, organised by Cheesemans' Ecology Safaris and led by Ted Cheeseman, spent 11 days in South Georgia and three days in the Falkland Islands. Cheeseman Expeditions focus on eco tourism and take pride in fulfilling their responsibilities to the environments they visit and the species that live there. For them the term eco-tourism is a philosophy not just a trendy label.

With a desire to give something back to the places that are visited by his clients, Ted Cheeseman arranged for the passengers to tidy up Dyke Bay, close to the settlement on Carcass Island. The bay is open to the prevailing westerly winds, and, as a result, much of the typical detritus of the fishing industry is washed up on the shore.

Cash machines and goose poo


HAVING just spent two weeks in your beautiful, dramatic Islands, 1 would respectfully like to pass on a few observations which might just help to oil the wheels of tourism


Remembrance in London


THE Remberance Day Parade held in London included 120 SAMA members this year.

More C&W bandwidth coming soon

CABLE and Wireless South Atlantic Ltd has announced a significant upgrade to the Falklands internet capacity.

Justin McPhee from Cable and Wireless said: "We monitor the use of our bandwidth carefully. Over the past few weeks we have seen a significant rise in internet use. Therefore new equipment and bandwidth capacity has been ordered to meet this demand."

A Cable and Wireless spokesperson said that in April of 2009 the circuit was increased from 6Mb/s download and 2Mb/s upload to 8Mb/s and 4Mb/s respectively. The next increase will see another large rise; the download circuit will increase to 12Mb/s and the upload to 5Mbs. In less than a year the circuit capacity will have increased by 100%.

Mr McPhee said that the upgrade is more expensive and complicated to install than the last increase, as new hardware is required to carry the additional capacity.

"The hardware has been ordered and is due to arrive on the Islands within the next week or so, the order for the extra bandwidth has been placed and our suppliers are on standby. We anticipate that the circuit should be installed and tested during the first half of December. We know how important it is for our customers to have sufficient bandwidth and we are working hard to implement this upgrade as quickly as possible."

Delighted at result of campaign

THE results of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board's first online marketing campaign in the UK have been outstanding, according to Jake Downing, General Manager of FITB.

The campargn ran from August 18 to October 27, and included a series of print adverts in the Guardian and Observer newspapers, as well as 1.5 million online adverts on the Guardian's own website. The adverts were designed to encourage visits to a dedicated Falkland Islands 'microsite'.

The tourist board worked closely with the editorial team at the Guardian to create the microsite – a separate mini-website, which was displayed as an offshoot to the Guardian's own website. It included an image gallery of the Falkland Islands, as well as information about what to do and see, links to other relevant websites, plus a competition to win a holiday to the Falklands.

By the end of the campaign the microsite had been viewed by 17,342 users and the competition had received 10,296 entries.

"This far surpasses our initial expectations," said Mr Downing, "And what's particularly exciting is that 20% of the competition entrants requested further information on holidays in the Falkland Islands.

"We're now in the process of sending information out to each and every one of these potential holidaymakers."

Penny Bartram, Guardian Plus Group Head, agreed that the campaign had performed incredibly well.

"We received double the number of online visitors that we would expect for a campaign of this size." said Ms Bartram. "We were overwhelmed by the number of competition entries submitted for this once in a lifetime prize – proving that the Falkland Islands is seen as a very desirable destination by Guardian readers."

Mr Downing said: "We were delighted to see so much interest and our aim now is to convert as many of the competition entrants as possible into visitors for the coming season, and also for the following season (2010/ 11)."

The Meat Company - reaching local and worldwide markets

FIMCO hosted an open day on October 31. A good mix of farmers, general public and prospective councillors attended, and visitors were able to discuss and follow the entire processes. from livestock selection to the product reaching the customer in Europe.

The changes in livestock transport were discussed, and how they affect both the producer and FIMCO. Those producers on the far West will of course be adversely affected, unless a cost effective and workable solution can be found, and concerns were expressed that the 2010 export season is not too far away for this to be addressed. Slaughter Hall

Leading into the production areas, which were cleaned up just in time, following the slaughter of cattle that had arrived from the West the previous evening, visitors were given an explanation of the slaughter system by Arturo Tellez.

The new Electrical Stimulation system which was installed in 2009, which essentially assists in the tenderisation of the product, was demonstrated on DVD.

Moving into the carcase chiller area, the capacities, and pressure on the area were explained. It is designed on the English abattoir system rather than an export plant, which needs at least twice the daily kill capacity in order to complete the 'setting' and tenderisation process.

Microbiological testing requirements of both fresh carcases and contact surfaces were shown, with details of the process required and some actual results from 2009 which demonstrated that FIMCo is well within the strict parameters set by the EU.

The Local Market processing area, purpose built as part of Phase I of the plant upgrade, to replace the converted 40 foot container previously used, was opened up with a good number of photos and other information demonstrating that side



of processing in operation. Sales revenue for the non-export operation accounted for 25% of the total income in 2008-09, a significant contribution to the turnover. Export Cutting Room

The heart of the export operation is the Cutting Room, where chilled carcases are transformed into a whole range of products. From retail lamb legs and French Racks (restaurant style lamb chops) to multon and lamb primals, to layer or bulk packed 25 kg cartons of boneless mutton (for the food processing industry).

Essentially, for mutton, the work is mostly carried out on the cutting tables with more simplistic packing. However, when lambs are processed the amount of effort and complexity of the packaging and labelling is directly reflected in the price received. For example, a lamb leg may be cut and trimmed to a certain customer's specification, but if the processor (FIMCO) then calibrates, labels and packs the cut into a number of different weight ranges, the return is considerably higher for very little additional work. This is where export plants make their increased or 'value added' return from a standard product.

Of course, all types of product need to be stored separately for efficient stock control and the ability to reach when loading into the shipping containers, and this is where FIMCO currently struggles considerably. There is not only insufficient space in the cold store for product separation, there is also a lack of space to accumulate enough product in order to utilise 40 foot reefer containers, which are much less expensive to ship. All processing is carried out un-

All processing is carried out under the watchful eye of Matt Kelly (Production Manager) with Nigel Leach (Quality Control) conducting ongoing checks.

Where does the Falkland Islands product go?

As the Falkland Islands meat industry and markets develop, destination countries will no doubt alter. However, essentially, the cuts from lighter lambs and mutton are more favoured in Scandinavia and Spain, with the heavier cuts and manufacturing mainly going to UK, France and Germany. Salted sheep and lambskins have also been successfully exported to the UK, Chile and Uruguay, with some of the lamb skins being tanned and returned from Uruguay as decoration skins. Processing salted skins in any volume is impossible at present, as the necessary space is being used as temporary livestock housing until it is rectified as part of the plant upgrade. **How is it marketed?**

The international meat industry is new to FIMCO and the Falkland Islands, and in 2003 it was recognised that a 'one person does all' marketing manager does not have the specialist industry knowledge to market products from a number of different industries.

The knowledge and skills for marketing fish are quite different to woot or meat, for example. This is why FIMCO took the critical step of engaging the services of a successful company (Simunovic SA of Punta Arenas, Chile) which has several large farms producing in excess of 30,000 lambs for processing, in addition to a large modern lamb and beef export production plant. They are well respected in the meat industry for producing a consistent high class product.

Acting as sales and marketing agents for FIMCO, Simunovic researches the market, introduces new customers and then both Greg Somervell (the Simunovic agent) and myself discuss and agree prices with the customer. FIMCO has the final say on all sales prices, which then translate into a contract between FIMCO and the customer, with payment being made directly to FIMCO. Staffing

FIMCo has a full time team of 11, of which seven work in production. During the export season, the total staff increases to approximately 48, with local staff being recruited wherever possible.

FIMCo Review and Revised Business Plan

FIMCo is currently supplied by 60 plus farms with a mixture of sheep, lambs, beef and pigs, of which over 30 farms are lamb suppliers (increasing sharply from just seven

in the near future. Produced in much more detail, the revised Business Plan is expected to generally confirm the 2007-08 estimates, which projected the company moving into profit in approximately 2017-18 with decreasing levels of subsidy required in the preceding years. What is required to move into profit? a) Completion of Phases II and

lamb suppliers a few years ago). Visitors were able to discuss the controversial matters affecting FIMCO's subsidy level and whether the company could demonstrate an ability to move into profit and a potential time scale.

Whilst the Business Plan revision is near completion and will be taken to the FIMCO Board for consideration and approval in the near future, the FIMCO Review (being carried out by the Head of Policy and GM FIDC) is also expected to be completed and presented to FIG in the near future.

a) Completion of Phases II and III the Sand Bay plant upgrade, to make the operation more efficient and able to harvest and sell more of the product than is currently possible (red offal, skins, value-added)

b) A concerted effort by the majority of farms (it is recognised that not all farms will be willing or able to participate) to take their average lambing percentage from 64% to 74%; a decrease in death rates and increase in ewe body condition etc, which the more progressive producers are improving on, with the assistance of the Department of Agriculture (DoA) and Farm Improvement Plans (FIP).

A tough call, but one agreed by the leading farmers, DoA, FIMCO and FIDC as challenging, but achievable. Beef exports of older cattle (mostly to manufacturing and food service) will be trialed in 2010 by integration into the sheep/lamb season.

Finally, some lambskins were sold and a range of local meats were transformed into several very nice curries and a casserole by the Falklands Brasserie, with the proceeds of the day (approximately £300) going to a local Cancer Support charity. John Ferguson



WILL the Governor as senior representative of the FCO be amongst the first people to both walk and drive (where possible) across each of the four minefields immediately after their clearance in 2010? If not why not?

A The answer to this question was provided by His Excellency the Governor Mr Alan Huckle.

Like others. I shall want to be completely reassured that the minefields have been fully cleared before venturing onto them.

But ensuring the safety of the de-mining process has been a matter of the highest priority for the FCO both in setting the de-mining standards in consultation with the Falkland Islands Government and in appointing a contractor with a strong, proven de-mining safety record - and the De-mining Programme Office (DPO) has been set up to oversee the work of the contractor to ensure, through close operational quality assurance and control, that the requisite clearance standards are fully met. The BACTEC de-miners will

The BACTEC de-miners will themselves demonstrate publicly that the minefields, once cleared, are safe, before submitting a certificate of clearance to the UK National Mine Action Authority for acceptance by the UK and FI Governments.

The whole aim of the de-mining process is to provide the necessary reassurance to Falkland Islanders that the relevant minefield fences can safely come down. Once that happens, there should be full public confidence in accessing the cleared areas.

If that requires some further demonstration by the Governor, then I shall be up for it.


Q WHO is responsible for maintaining camp cemeteries?

although they may choose to.

I guess it is one of those areas where there was originally a notional communal responsibility in the days of the big farms, but that has now gone, as has any significant emotional attachment between those owning or living in the farm and those buried there in most cases.

MR Pointing said on the radio that there were around 500 dogs in the Islands. What is the proportion of pets as opposed to the working dogs? How many dogs were in the islands 50 years ago bearing in mind that they were only horses and dogs for the gathering of sheep and more shepherds?

A Veterinary assistant Sarah Bowles replied.

The 2008/2009 farming statistics show there are 494 working dogs in the Falklands (this is the figure which Steve Pointing referred to on the radio). There are currently 128 dogs kept as pets (102 in Stanley and 26 outside of Stanley).

The farming statistics from 50 years ago did not contain dog numbers. These figures were first included in the 1969/70 edition of the publication and show a total of 980 working dogs. There are no records of numbers of pet dogs kept at that time.

Q WHY do people have to pay more to go on an Outer Island "Round Robin Flight" than they do if they go on the East West Shuttle?

A FIGAS Manager Shaun Minto provided the following response.

The Northern and Southern Round Robins are typically much longer and go to more destinations than the East-West Round Robins.

A return flight on the East-West Shuttle can cost up to $\pounds171.46$ ($\pounds100$ for residents). A Round Robin flight on the Northern and Southern Shuttles costs $\pounds75$.

Tiny marine plants help store carbon

LARGE blooms of tiny marine plants called phytoplankton are flourishing in areas of open water left exposed by the recent and rapid melting of ice shelves and glaciers around the Antarctic Peninsula.

This remarkable colonisation is having a beneficial impact on climate change. As the blooms die back phytoplankton sinks to the sea-bed where it can store carbon for thousands or millions of years.

Scientists from British Antarc-tic Survey (BAS) reported this week that this new natural 'sink' is taking an estimated 3.5 million tonnes of carbon from the ocean and atmosphere each year.

Lead author, Professor Lloyd Peck from BAS said, "Although this is a small amount of carbon compared to global emissions of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere it is nevertheless an important discovery. It shows nature's ability to thrive in the face of adversity

"We need to factor this natural carbon-absorption into our calculations and models to predict future climate change. So far we don't know if we will see more events like this around the rest of Antarctica's coast but it's something we'll be keeping a close eye on



PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE

The FI Constitution (s.81) provides that there shall be a Public Accounts Committee (PAC) consisting of:

(a) a chairman and two other members appointed by the Governor, acting after consultation with elected Members of the Legislative Assembly from among persons who are not members of the Legislative Assembly; and

(b) two elected members of the Legislative Assembly elected by majority of the Assembly.

Expressions of interest are invited from members of the public who would wish to be considered for appointment to the PAC under (a) above. The functions of the PAC are set out in the Fl Constitution (s.81) and in the Public Accounts Ordinance 2009. Appointment to the PAC will initially be for two years.

The PAC will have an important scrutiny role over the public accounts of all government departments and specified bodies to ensure that public funds have been expended properly for the purposes for which they were voted by the Legislative Assembly. In carrying out its functions, the PAC will consider, in terms of economy, effectiveness and efficiency, the 'value for money' benefit derived from the expenditure of public money. The PAC may also consider the adequacy of the Government's arrangements for the management of financial risk.

This will, therefore, be a major opportunity for individuals appointed to the PAC to make a significant contribution in helping to maintain high standards of public administration and good governance in the Falklands.

Applications should be submitted to the Governor <u>by Fri-</u> <u>day 27 November '09</u> setting out the reasons for the applicant's interest in appointment to the PAC and the skills and experience that the applicant would bring to the job.

PUBLIC NOTICE FROM THE RETIREMENT PENSIONS BOARD OF MANAGEMENT RETIREMENT PENSIONS FUND

CLAIMING A PENSION

Contributors to the Retirement Pensions Fund (previously known as the Old Age Pensions Fund) are reminded to claim a pension upon reaching the age of 64 years. For widows and widowers a pension may be claimed upon reaching the age of 60 years. Claim to Pension forms can be obtained from the Pensions Office at the Treasury.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO RETIREMENT PENSION SCHEME

It is compulsory for all persons resident in the Falkland Islands between the ages of 17 to 64, and who have earnings in excess of the current limit of $\pounds 180$ per week, to contribute to the Fund. It is important for all contributors to have as full a pension record as possible. An incomplete pension record will result in only a partial pension at retirement.

APPLYING FOR CONTRIBUTION CREDITS

Any person who considers they are unable to afford making contributions is advised to contact the Pensions Office at the Treasury to see if they are eligible to apply to the Board of Management for assistance. Under certain circumstances the Government will pay contributions on behalf of contributors. To be eligible a person must be earning less than the current limit of £180 per week and:

- entitled to a family allowance, or
- looking after a person who is entitled to an attendance allowance. or
- unable to work due to ill health, or
- following a prescribed course of education/training, or
- actively seeking employment.







Injured in horror crash

ISLANDER Jane Cameron is making a slow recovery in hospital in Trelew, Argentina after an horrific car accident which left one passenger fighting for his life and another dead.

Government Archivist Jane was travelling with a Dutch film crew retracing the Beagle voyage.

Petra Niegeman died in the accident, near Puerto Madryn on November 11, and Charles Boissevain was seriously injured.

Janet Robertson travelled to her friend's bedside on Saturday. She said on Wednesday Jane was well stabilised, following a seven and a half hour operation, and the medical team had been able to reduce some of her medication.

The doctor had said the news was "very optimistic," and that Jane had "incredible strengths." He said he hoped that within 24 hours he would be able to say that "the storm is over."

At the time of going to press the Penguin News was unable to contact Janet for an update.

West Store rakes in sales and new staff

THE West Store is raking in record takings – and taking on extra staff – after the opening this week of its much anticipated £1m extension.

With 30 per cent extra floor space, a revamped electrical section, new car park and new product lines across most areas, manager Paul Lewis said he was delighted with the refurbishment.

"The extension is just something that we needed, really," he said. "We are trying to aim for the extended range, more fresh food, and more promotions."

"The biggest improvement of all is the car park. Now we've got a huge car park, it's much easier for customers to shop."

Sales in the electrical department on Wednesday's opening day were equivalent to a full week's normal revenue.

"We sold quite a few laptops, Wii consoles, DVDs and CDs," said Mr Lewis. "There was a lot of excitement around those."

Staff numbers also are being lifted to cope with extra demand.

"We have taken on extra staff and we are interviewing this week for another three or four, and maybe more in the future," said Mr Lewis.

A 60-seat 20-table cate opens today, serving coffee, sandwiches, pasties, paninis and cakes, and the new delicatessen will soon be selling freshly prepared ready to cook pizzas.


"One of the biggest attractions has also been the new range of make-up," said Mr Lewis, who is seeking customer feedback across all product lines.

"The range in is what customers have asked for," he said. "It's just the starting point. Anything else you want, just ask."

A separate counter near the entrance from the new car park allows customers to buy cigarettes, drinks, sandwiches and magazines without queuing at the main tills, similar to those which

are provided in UK supermarkets. Eventually a time line of the West Store through the ages will decorate the walls.

The plans for the extension were put forward approximately a year ago, by previous manager David Castle, who handed the project over to Mr Lewis when he arrived. The construction company, Ian Stewart Construction, has been on site for about eight months.

Mr Lewis thanked customers for their patience while renovations were carried out, and he promised to stop moving products around the shelves from now on.

"Thanks to everyone who has helped, Ian Stewart, Energise, the staff and everyone else," he said.

Some staff were putting the finishing touches to the new dis-

plays up to 1am on Wednesday. FIC handyman Luis Quinto said: "I'm really pleased. It's worked well. I hope that people are pleased, that's the most important thing."

Customer Kirsty Barkman said: "It's amazing isn't it. It's a lot bigger than I thought it was going to be. I didn't know I needed so much stuff!"

By the time it is finished the extension will have cost close to £1 million, "a big investment from FIC for the Falklands," said Mr Lewis.

FIC general manager Roger Spink told the Penguin News; "We're very pleased with it. It's down to the tremendous hard work of Paul and his team.

"We hope our customers will be as equally pleased with what they find inside the store.

"It's fantastic. It was a team effort from them all, the electricians and builders as well as staff. Everyone has pulled together to make it work."

Neville Hayward, manager of Seafish Chandlery, said he welcomed the move by his rivals.

"Competition is always healthy," he said. "It keeps all of us on our toes. At the end of the day the customer is going to win out, and we will carry on offering the customers what they want."

Mrs Marjorie Vinson was in fact the first lady to be elected to Council when she stood in 1964 and later, Mrs Ning King conducted a successful campaign in 1969.

Some ten years later Mrs Mary Jennings was appointed as a member of Executive Council and is believed to be the first woman to receive this honour.

The Edwards family's husband and wife, father and daughter duos are still believed to be political firsts for the Falklands Legislative Council.

This week's cruise ships schedule

THREE cruise ships are visiting the Islands this week with just one calling into Stanley.

Ushuaia carrying 90 passengers calls at Saunders Island today, having visited New Island, West Point and Carcass Island. Polar Star (105 passengers) visits New Island on Monday and arrives in Stanley on Tuesday.

Minerva (441 passengers) calls at West Point on Thursday before making its way to Stanley for a Friday visit.

Traffic delays likely as mine clearance begins

CLEARANCE of the Surf Bay minefields is due to get underway next week and the mine clearance company BACTEC hopes to cause as little disruption as possible to the public.

Project Manager Roger Gagen said due to the nature of the work it would be necessary to close some roads during the clearance process.

As there is a strict safety distance associated with these activities, BACTEC aims to ensure any closures cause the least amount of disruption to local people, visitors and tourists

The Surf Bay minefields will cause the least disruption as, with the assistance of Roads Engineer Bob Hancox, it is intended to divert traffic over Boxer Bridge between 8am and 4pm Monday to Saturday, to allow access to Stanley Airport. There will however not be any access to the beach at Surf Bay during working hours to prevent the public entering the safety exclusion area, said Mr Gagen.

Clearance at Surf Bay is scheduled to begin on November 28 after a period of refresher training has been completed and at Sapper Hill a short while after

Sapper Hill may cause a bit more disruption for a limited period in December as there is no suitable diversion for the Mount Pleasant Road, said Mr Gager. He

said the mine clearance company would liaise with the local authorities and the public to ensure disturbance to everyday life was minimal.

"Traffic sentries will be used to filter traffic through as it builds up, so hopefully no one should be kept waiting longer than 15 minutes. However, if an emergency vehicle approaches work can be stopped more quickly," said Mr Gager

The waiting period at the end of the day, between 3pm and 4pm may be slightely longer as this will be BACTEC's demolition window each day, he warned driv-

As members of the 33 strong demining team are freed up from the Surf Bay and Sapper Hill clearance, they will be deployed to Goose Green and Fox Bay with as much notice as possible given to settlement managers, said Mr Gagen, adding that these areas would be easier to control with less daily traffic.

Please remember that if you are delayed it is only for your own safety," he said.

Speaking of his appointment, Professor Drewry said: "I am delighted to have been elected to this position and to take over from the very capable hands of David Tatham. South Georgia holds a special place in the hearts of those who work in and travel to Antarctica, even if they have not visited themselves. Its breathtaking scenery, prolific and colourful wildlife combined with a rich history of exploration and economic activity have made it a place of considerable significance. I hope that I can assist in promoting further the aims of the Association, of South Georgia and the many opportunities it presents.

Power outage

ON Wednesday evening shortly after 9pm, the smaller of two generating sets at the Power and Electrical Section of PWD developed an electrical fault and automatically shut down. The larger set overloaded and shortly tripped off. Staff responded but were unable to resolve the issue within the short amount of time available. At the time of the fault, wind conditions were calm and there was little or no contribution to Stanley's power demand from the wind farm. The Power and Electrical Section apologised to consumers for the power failure.

Falklands film

THE Falklands are again the subject of a documentary film, presented at the Mar del Plata International Cinema Festival by Italian director Antonio Cervi. Named "Las Islas" (The Islands), Mr Cervi said one of the main aspects to consider was how many Argentines would be willing to live in the Falklands, given Patagonia's emptiness, and the fact that families had been living in the Islands for more than 150 years. "This must be considered and respected," he said

Stranded in ice

THE Russian registered Kapitan Khlebnikov icebreaker, operated by Quark Expeditions in the Antarctic since 1992, has been stranded in ice this week due to sea-ice compressing around the ship, reducing its manoeuvrability. On Wednesday after inching their way towards open water some 9 kilometres away, they were waiting for weather conditions to improve before beginning the transit north. All on board are safe and well.

Green bacteria

SCIENTISTS have developed a special kind of bacteria which glows in the presence of landmines. The bacteria, which forms green patches when sprayed onto the ground next to an undetonated explosive, can also be dropped via aeroplane in extremely sensitive areas. With 87 countries worldwide littered with undetonated landmines, it could prove an invaluable asset to mine clearance in the future.

Falklands Facebookers networking worldwide

WHILE social networking site Facebook has been an international hit since its beginnings in 2004, its administrators might be surprised to hear that in this little corner of the world more than 80 per cent of the population are Facebook friends.

For it seems the effect of no television or radio reception on West Falkland Islands has given rise to a whole new approach to communications and socialising between isolated farms and settlements.

More than four of every five households on the West now exchange news, banter and agricultural updates via their Facebook pages.

A quick count of West Falklands pages indicates that more than 43 of the 53 households (the latter figure from the most recent census) regularly update their "status," while a few more of the less technically able are still struggling to upload a "profile pic."

One West householder told the Penguin News: "Actually it's quite handy because if you can't track someone down you can check their status and it might mention that they're off to town for a trip or there's a moan about the weather because they're going off working with sheep or cattle."

Rounding up far-flung pals for a barbecue or "two-nighter." exchanging cheeky teasing and keeping in touch with children at college overseas are other popular uses of the site that says it offers "the power to share and make the world more open and connected."

Avid user Rachel Marsh (15) of Fox Bay said: "I spend a crazy amount of time keeping in touch

with family and friends. I can't watch TV in my spare time at the moment so I chat to people and check out the quizzes and photo uploads."

West Islander Dot Gould, who lives in Somerset, UK, uses Facebook to chat to her family back home. She said: "It is a fantastic way of keeping in touch with everyone in the islands, I love looking at everyone's photos so I can see what I'm missing, but then I get homesick."

Facebook has more than 250 million active users with the fastest growing demographic being those aged 35 years and older.

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Shackleton's whisky to be savoured after more than a century on ice

EXPLORERS are planning to recover a rare batch of whisky lost during explorer Sir Ernest Shackleton's ill-fated voyage to the South Pole a century ago.

Two crates of the now extinct "Rare Old" brand of McKinlay and Co whisky have been buried in the Antarctic ice since Shackleton was forced to abandon his Polar mission in 1909.

The whisky giant that owns McKinlay and Co has asked a team of New Zealand explorers heading out on a January expedition to return a sample of the drink for a series of experiments.

The team intends to utilise special drills to free the trapped crates and rescue a bottle from the wreckage, which is believed to have been discarded 97 miles from the Pole. If they cannot retrieve a full bottle, they are hoping to use a

syringe to extract some of the contents. The sample will then be brought home to Richard Paterson. Whyte & Mackay's master blender, who intends to replicate the famous old whisky. If the experiment is successful, original McKinlay whisky could be put back on sale.

Mr Paterson said: "I really hope we can get some back here. It's been lying there lonely and neglected. It should come back to Scotland where it was born."

Shackleton and his men were donated the crates of whisky as they set off for the South Pole in 1907. Severe weather conditions meant they had to be rescued two years later when just days away from reaching their target.

All supplies were then left behind in their hut at Cape Royds, including the two cases of whisky.

The crates were discovered by Polar explorers in January 2006, but couldn't be removed as they were too deeply embedded. However, the team going back to Antarctica next year has agreed to try to retrieve some bottles.

According to international protocols agreed by 12 Antarctic Treaty nations, the crates can only be taken off Antarctica for conservation reasons.

Philatelists' roadshow coming soon to Stanley

THE next few weeks could be an exciting time for Falklands stamp collectors who have wondered what the value of their collections are, or have interesting items they would like an expert opinion on.

Philatelist and postal history researcher Stefan Heijtz from Sweden, author of the handbook of Falklands stamps (Specialised Stamp Catalogue of the Falkland Islands and Dependencies, currently in its fifth edition, and first issued in 1987), is back in the Falklands for a three month visit between October and January.

Stefan worked as the Antarctic Postman onboard the RRS Bransfield and James Clark Ross for two seasons during the 1990s, and also worked in the Philatelic Bureau in Stanley between his journeys South.

He has been joined in the Falklands this week by fellow members of the FIPSG (Falkland Islands Philatelic Study Group), chairman Hugh Osborne and committee member Kim Stuckey.

The three authorities on Falklands stamps are planning lectures on the philately of the Falklands, and a meeting will be held for members of the public.

In addition a Falklands' philately roadshow - along the lines of the popular television series Antiques Roadshow - is planned, where collectors can take along their stamps, covers and envelopes to be valued.

Items up to and including the 1982 war will be of particular interest and possibly the most valuable, said Mr Osborne, adding that after that time unless it has a particularly interesting background, items would have a lesser value.

How the Falklands have taught a lesson in democracy to the world

Former BBC Latin America Correspondent Harold Briley reflects on the changing of the guard in this month's election.

THE Falkland Islands General Election has been a boost to democracy, not just in the Islands but also more widely.

In 60 years as a political journalist, covering many elections in the UK and around the world. I have never previously come across an election replacing the whole previous legislature.

The record turn-out of more than 77 per cent is the envy of many bigger nations, beset by apathy and disillusionment with politics.

The sweeping rejection of the old Legislative Council signals the desire for change and the electorate took decisive action to achieve it. The new blend of ex-councillors returning to government and younger, new councillors provides an impressive mix of experience and fresh minds and perspectives.

The Falklands are fortunate to have a pool of people with integrity and dedication, both new and former councillors.

Members such as Mike Summers with 30 years experience, have been impressive articulate ambassadors internationally.

It is refreshing that the councillor topping the poll. 55-yearold Dick Sawle. is not an Islander by birth or historic family ties, but a former teacher from the UK.

Too often there is an insular prejudice against incomers who have not endured the trauma of invasion and war, and government officials appointed from the UK with little prior knowledge but much influence are viewed with suspicion.

Dick Sawle, whose responsibilities include trade and industry, is a successful entrepreneur who built up an international fishing business, and a Spanish-speaker. His experience in the Chamber of

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Turkey's behaviour under scrutiny

BRANDON Breen, better known locally as the Turkey Man, has been collating the information gathered as a result of tagging turkeys to study their behaviour just over two years ago. In total, 49 vultures were tagged in 2007 and 2008.

Brandon thanked the volunteers who have observed tagged vultures and taken the time to contact Falklands Conservation to report their sightings. "We are gaining new insights on this often-seen native species. To date, hundreds of sightings have been called in."

He said it has been discovered that the individual Turkey Vultures that feed at the Eliza Cove tip also travel as far afield as North Arm, Goose Green, Swan Inlet, Smylie's Farm, Elephant Beach, Horseshoe Bay Farm and Kidney Island, to name a few locations.

We learned that one vulture Yellow 22 - made a trip to Bleaker Island in October 2007. returned to the mainland at Sussex farm, and was again sighted on Bleaker in August 2008. Additionally, we are starting to see indications that individual vultures have "friends" - individuals with whom they are more likely to be

seen." Vultures 104 and 128 have been seen together three times in addition to being trapped and tagged the same day. Several other "pairs" of vultures also have been seen together three times

"Every single sighting of a tagged vulture is valuable, in helping us to fill in missing pieces in the incomplete jigsaw puzzle of their natural history," said Mr Breen.

Continue to call Falkland Conservation and report your new sightings, as well as any old and unreported sightings. Your sighting may provide a previously undocumented location for a vulture, or may show that a given bird - unseen for a long period - indeed is still alive.

Guardsman Hughes saddles up to discover the real Falklands

THE brother of a Welsh Guard who died on the Sir Galahad in 1982, chose a unique way to honour the memory of his sibling during his recent visit.

Ian Hughes, himself a Welsh Guard, was just 13 years-old when his brother Neil Hughes died on June 8, after the vessel was bombed by Argentine Skyhawk aircraft at Fitzroy. Thirty-two Welsh Guards died that day as well as five RFA crewmen and 11 Army personnel. The Sir Galahad was scuttled at sea as a war grave on June 25, 1982.

Making his second visit to the Islands, fan decided he would like to make the journey from Fitzroy to Stanley by horse-back to see first hand the type of terrain the survivors of his brother's battalion had traversed, and spare a thought for the geographical difficulties the men faced, as well as the dangers of attack by the enemy.

When I was contacted by SAMA Chairman Gary Clement to see if it would be possible to organise such a ride I knew I wouldn't be able to find the track, but I knew a man who could, who also had the perfecthorse for Ian to ride. Bobby Short was duly

elected to lead the mission and it was arranged with the military precision we have come to expect from the 'Brigadier' – so named on earlier rides with military personnel between Wine Glass Station and Darwin. One bellow from Bob and everyone knows what they are supposed to be doing.

We were blessed with perfect weather from the early hours when we loaded up four horses and headed out towards the Vantan on the Mount Pleasant road. With the Fitzroy Bridge put out of action during the war, it was decided to

Charisma was back at work on the weekend carrying 61 year old Royal Marine veteran Graham Du Feu to Cape Pembroke Lighthouse and the Atlantic Conveyor memorial.

A regular rider from Devon, Graham was amazed at the sure-footedness of Falklands horses. Two nights of heavy rain however had left the ground soggy underfoot and the streams bursting at the seams. His longest ride in the past however had been of just an hour or so.

The next five hours were going to be a huge physical test for him, just as the journey had been for his brother's comrades.

The first pit stop was at the Old Shanty gate. We had arranged old-style Falklands fare of mutton ribs and fritters, washed down with hot coffee with a twist of rum in it. Just the thing to keep you swinging along the track for another couple of hours.

By the time we reached Port Harriet road the pain was obviously starting to set in for lan, but he never complained and he had also slithered down some pretty steep slopes without so much as a murmur, where I have to confess a few involuntary yelps had escaped through my gritted teeth.

As we made our way through Mount William and then Sapper Hill we paused to reflect on the view of Stanley spread out ahead of us and how it would have seemed to those who had fought their way to where we stood.

"They must have been relieved to see that," I said to Ian. "So am I." he replied. The five hour ride had been a big eye-opener for lan. One mile as the crow flies had turned into three or four with diversions around mine fields and swollen streams.

The lack of cover for the British Forces on the low ground had also been brought home. "It must have been a long, slow, nervous, skirmish to move forward," said lan adding that despite the dangers they had faced, there was bound to have been some typical, poor taste jokes being cracked among the men.

Comments from Guardsmen Mark Pemberton and Phil Moore, both injured in 1982, had prompted Ian to cover the distance on horseback - every picture you can possibly take has already been done so many times, try to do something a bit different - they had advised him.

The horse ride had, lan said, enabled him to "feel the size of the Islands."

"What the lads did in 1982 is phenomenal," he added. Safely back in Stanley Ian said

Safely back in Stanley Ian said he felt OK, apart from the expected pain in obvious areas and the disappearance of most of the hair from his legs (those who have been on similar jaunts will understand). The refreshments provided by Violet Clarke, Lyndsay Short and Sammy Marsh at key points had also helped considerably, however he said that he didn't see too many repeating the journey in such a fashion.

lan's first visit was with his mother in 1983. "Stanley was like a shanty town. The Argies had wrecked it and it was difficult at that point for parents to believe that it had been worth it." he said.

"Now when I go home I can tell Mum that they didn't die for nothing."

The visit won't be Ian's last. He plans to return as often as possible and would like to retrace the route from San Carlos with his boys. "I've done what I can this time and managed to put a few ghosts to rest," he said, adding, "I can't believe how well the veterans are treated here – it's done me a lot of good."

around to the change that they promised will not be easy. It is hard, as they say, to think about draining the swamp when you are up to your cychalls in alligators.

What they can and should do without delay is develop a constant and meaningful two-way dialogue with the voters. Now, the electorate expects their leaders to be good communicators who are up to speed with the latest technology, and transparent in their work. Even in the Falklands, the information revolution has changed the way people think. They expect to be informed, consulted, kept in the picture and listened to.

The old guard lost because they did not show adequate respect for the electorate. So the new councillors need to learn that lesson, and start blogging, twittering, facebooking, and running websites that keep the voters up to date and allow a two-way flow of views. On-line opinion polls should be embraced.

If the newcomers don't understand that people expect a more interactive government, they too will eventually be given their marching orders

Time for a freedom of information act

I HOPE you can stand the cheek of an expat Islander sharing his thoughts about your domestic issues. I would like to include a pair of suggestions for the new councillors in every column I write for the next few months. I'll aim for one big idea and one small one.

The big idea first. Introduce a Freedom of Information Act. The introduction of the act in the UK. was one of the few good things that Tony Blair did while he was at number 10. It turned and bit him, of course, when reporters demanded to see records of crucial meetings held in the run up to war in Iraq, but overall both the government and the people have benefited.

Everyone has got used to it, many official papers and minutes are published on the internet. preempting the need for formal FOI requests. That spirit of transparency would be good for Islanders. and they deserve it.

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



A great day out onboard the SS Great Britain after decades of restoration **GRIZ Cockwell and Bill Luxton visited the**

final resting place of the SS Great Britain in Bristol this September, 39 years after the ship left the Falkland Islands, Now an awardwinning visitor attraction and museum ship with up to 170,000 visitors annually, the experience proved a memorable one.

MANY people will remember the SS Great Britain as part of the Falklands landscape for so many years, and will also remember her removal in 1970.

When I last saw her in Bristol some 26 or so years ago, she'd had quite a lot of work done on deck, but down below more or less all the restoration was at the planning stage. What a different story now - there has been an incredible amount of work done, and a visit to the Great Britain is well worth taking in as part of a holiday in the UK, not least because the dock side area is attractive, the whole site is well run and the staff are very friendly and helpful.

The main focus of interest is of course the ship itself, but there are also a lot of fascinating exhibits and information in the excellent Museum alongside. There is a wealth of detail about the story of the ship that throws a lot of light on the social history of the time, in particular the emigrations to Australia. There is also a lot of information about how goods were moved all over the world, and what those goods were.

On going round the ship, the differences between the first class and steerage passenger's accommodation are very marked, although even the first class accommodation seems cramped, and it looks as if people then must have been quite a lot smaller than we (or at least some of us) are now. The bunks are rather small.

However, they had the luxury of private cabins, whereas in steerage everyone was crammed in together in very dingy conditions - there are some telling stories in the wealth of information about the emigrations, of problems with some of the steerage passengers getting drunk, fighting and other such misdemeanours.

I wouldn't be surprised if such things didn't happen within the ranks of the first class passengers too but the records don't seem to talk about that so much.

The cabins form just part of the beautifully restored below decks - the first class dining sa-

loon is very striking, two of the long tables are laid for dinner with the Great Britain china, all the mirrors glittering on the walls, handsome marble colonnades with quantities of gilded scrolling and decoration on them, and richly coloured carpet and gleaming wood, reflecting the light from all the brass lamps - all the details perfect. The whole large saloon creates an impression of solid, luxurious Victorian gentility.

However, personally, I was just as interested in the details of how things actually worked, the galley with all the pots and ladles on the walls and several really impressive spits, the bakehouse, ships stores and the arrangements for the other passengers and the crew to get fed, the doctors surgery, the barber and so on, all working in ery cramped conditions.

There is a similar arrangement for warming and dehumidifying the air inside the hull as well. although it is not sealed off in the same way. You can walk right round the outside of the ship under the "water." The impression of being underwater is heightened because they have put a layer of water on top of the glass sealing plate so that the breeze ruffles it, and the light is reflected off the surface both above and below - magically, it makes the ship look alive again.

To look through this layer of water either from below or above is really amazing - either looking down at the people walking round under the "water," or up at the beautiful shape of the bow through the shimmering surface.

On deck the first class passengers have a special area where the other classes of passengers were not permitted to go, although there is only a painted line to show where this area is. There are also pens and housing for various animals. They carried hens, pigs, sheep, cows (and steers) and also horses.

The deck seems spacious and calm now, but it must have been a very different story when the ship was moving under sail. The only indication now of what must have been a lot of hustle and bustle on the heaving deck, added to all the lowing, bleating, snorting and cackling of the animals, is the huge quantity of lines all neatly coiled round belaying pins, and all the blocks and tackles for sail handling.

There are also massive stays for the masts, which look convincingly tarry but fortunately are painted with something a lot cleaner!

We were fortunate to visit on a very fine autumn day, because as well as all the interesting things on deck to do with the operation of sailing the ship, there are iconic items such as the ships bell, the wheel and the windlass, and in addition the ship is dressed overall with quantities of flags - on such a day it all looks very colourful and

animated. However, there is so much to look at, and it is all so interesting, that I would recommend a visit whatever the weather, and would also recommend allowing plenty of time. The café there is right on the river, so even when you want to stop and have a drink and a bite to eat, there is still all the river traffic to watch. Altogether a great day out.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE

The FI Constitution (s.81) provides that there shall be a Public Accounts Committee (PAC) consisting of:

a chairman and two other members appointed by the Governor, acting after (a) consultation with elected Members of the Legislative Assembly from among persons who are not members of the Legislative Assembly; and

(b) two elected members of the Legislative Assembly elected by majority of the Assembly.

Expressions of interest are invited from members of the public who would wish to be considered for appointment to the PAC under (a) above. The functions of the PAC are set out in the FI Constitution (s.81) and in the Public Accounts Ordinance 2009. Appointment to the PAC will initially be for two years.

Appointment to the PAC will initially be for two years. The PAC will have an important scrutiny role over the public accounts of all government departments and specified bodies to ensure that public funds have been expended properly for the purposes for which they were voted by the Legislative Assembly. In carrying out its functions, the PAC will consider, in terms of economy, effectiveness and efficiency, the 'value for money' benefit derived from the expenditure of public money. The PAC may also consider the adequacy of the Government's arrangements for the management of financial risk. for the management of financial risk.

This will, therefore, be a major opportunity for individuals appointed to the PAC to make a significant contribution in helping to maintain high standards of public administration and good governance in the Faklands. Applications should be submitted to the Governor by Friday 27 November '09 setting out the reasons for the applicant's interest in appointment to the PAC and the skills and experience that the applicant would bring to the job.



New satellite tagging to track elephant seals

SATELLITE tags have been attached to six female elephant seals so they can be tracked at sea and their feeding areas and patterns studied.

The Elephant Seal Research Group is an independent organisation of Italian researchers dedicated to the study of elephant seals. Fillipo Galimberti and Simona Sanvito are currently running a study of southern elephant seals (*Mirounga leonina*) at Sea Lion Island, the only breeding colony of the species in the Falklands.

Fillipo, who has been involved in the project for the last 14 years, said the satellite tagging was just a pilot study but it was the first time this type of study had been carried out in the Falklands.

The Falklands survey is intended to provide an updated list of breeding sites, a good estimate of the size of the population, and data about survival rate of different age classes.

Together with the high resolution data from the study of Sea Lion Island this new information should provide the parameters needed to determine the current status of the population and forecast its future, while being a useful tool for conservation.





Q WITH two Civil Servants serving on the new Assembly will they still be on pay when they are on Council business?

A Clerk of Councils, Claudette Prior answered.

Please see the following, taken from the Management Code. 18. Officer Performing Duties

as Elected Councillor. Officers who are elected to

serve as a member of Legislative Council and are required to undertake duties as an Elected Councillor during normal working hours, may choose to receive their salary or to take unpaid leave but receive an allowance as specified under the Elected Councillor Allowances Ordinance 1990 (as amended).

Officers will not be entitled to receive both an allowance and a salary unless they apply to their Head of Department to take paid leave in order to undertake duties as an Elected Councillor during normal working hours.

If the leave is agreed the officer will be eligible to receive his/her salary in addition to any allowance s/he may be entitled to under the Elected Councillor Allowances Ordinance 1990 (as amended).

Q FI Banknotes state: "These Notes Are Legal Tender For The Payment Of Any Amount." What does this mean in real English? Can you legally expect to pay a £100 bill with a £10note!

A Attorney General, David Pickup, provided the following response.

The wording on FI banknotes reflects section 9 of the Currency Ordinance. Under that section limits are placed on the amounts that can be paid by coins:

- Bronze coins can be used to pay up to an amount not exceeding 20p.

• Other coins of 10p or less can be used to pay an amount up to $\pounds 5$.

- Coins of more than 10p but less than $\pounds I$ can be used to pay an amount up to $\pounds 10$.

• Coins of £1 or more can be used to pay any amount.

So if you tried to pay a £1 debt by 1p coins, the person is not obliged to accept this in payment of the debt, but can accept this if they choose to do so.

The section goes on to provide that all FI banknotes can be used for the payment of any amount.

So what the wording on a FI banknote means is that if, for example, you owe someone a debt of £5,000, and nothing has been agreed as to how this debt should be paid off, you could pay this in £5 notes, and the person would have to accept this as a lawful discharge of the debt, and could not insist on being paid in £50 notes, or by cheque.

It does not mean that a person can pay a £100 debt with a £10 note! But he could lawfully pay that debt with 10 £10 notes, or indeed 20 £5 notes, or 100 £1 coins.

Q CAN Cable & Wireless provide approximate costs to customers of the following list of broadband applications?

Cable and Wireless IP Networks Supervisor Allan Steen, provided a response, detailing the cost of each application.

As all usage is prepaid on a per package basis the figures below all relate to cost per MB of 16p i.e. a Residential Bronze package overage charge.

Costs incurred within your allocated bundle or on a larger package would be lower than those indicated in our answers.

SPENDING one hour opening emails and replying to emails (with no attachments).

This would be dependent on how many emails you could receive and reply to in an hour and is very hard to price as the broadband service is not billed on time but on usage. Assuming 10 emails of 20kb each, sent and received, this amounts to 400Kb of data and you would be billed approximately seven pence.

SENDING one or more 200kb image files as attachments to an email message

To send one 200Kb image file attached to an email you would be charged approximately three pence.

UPLOADING one or more 200kb image files to a shared website, such as FaceBook.

To upload a single 200Kb image would cost approximately three pence.

OPENING a 2mb email attachment (such as a slideshow or video clip).

To download a 2Mb attachment will cost approximately 32 pence.

WATCHING one three-minute video clip from YouTube.

This is again dependent on various factors such as the resolution quality of the video. All videos on YouTube have this video information available by right clicking on the image and selecting "Show Video Info." A typical three minute video with a resolution of 600x360 amounts to roughly 22MB of data to download, and will cost approximately £3.52p.

SPENDING one hour surfing websites without downloading any files.

This is dependent on so many factors it would be hard to estimate a cost based on time, it would be dependent primarily on what the website content was.

If the sites were graphically intensive the cost would increase, also it would be dependent on what browser you use, browsers such as Opera can decrease image quality to reduce download size.

DOWNLOADING one 90minute movie.

The size of the download is dependent on the quality of the movie and the means of downloading, if it is a direct download from a site then it would be considerably less than if you downloaded it via a P2P network where other individuals are accessing the information you download so it appears as an upload on your usage.

DOWNLOADING one 60minute music album.

Again this is dependent on the quality of the music and the means of downloading so the same comments apply as did for downloading movies.

Take for example a 128Kb/s encoded 1Tunes album with 4 minutes of audio this equates to approximately 3.8Mb of data whereas a 256Kb/s encoded album of 5mins is roughly 10MB of data.

SPENDING one hour online and idle (ie away from the computer).

This shouldn't cost you anything, assuming you have no applications running in the background on your PC that are internet dependent.

There will be a small amount of usage attributed to an account, which is traffic generated between a modem and C&W core network to maintain a connection in a healthy state and available to use, this will only be accounted for if the modem is left switched on when not in use.

We do advise that if you are not actively using your connection to switch off the DSL modem to avoid unknown traffic occurring, and to prevent unauthorized access via a wireless connection if enabled.

SPENDING one hour using free messaging services such as Hotmail Messenger and FaceBook instant messaging. Both of these applications are web based and are dependent on accessing the service either from a website or from a dedicated application such as MSN messenger. To estimate the usage associated with this would be difficult and dependent on if the user was sending images while texting and if the user had other applications running simultaneously.

SPENDING one hour using Skype (not including any Skype fees).

As Skype is an application that will automatically adjust to current circuit quality this will affect data throughput, therefore it would be extremely hard to estimate cost of a one hour call.

The cost will obviously increase if the user is using video along with audio and is again dependent on the quality of the web cam in use.

Additional comment from Mr Steen.

In an attempt to self manage your usage, and to get a comparison between what you use and what is displayed on our usage website, it may be useful to consider using a Bandwidth Monitor. We have seen many customers use such an application to good effect.

A particularly good monitor is available at www.bwmonitor.com This can be used on one PC at a time and monitors the connection from the PC to the DSL modem. If you have multiple PC's using the same internet connection each PC will have to be monitored individually.

For customers on a DSL connection i.e. Stanley and larger rural locations, please be aware that your daily usage will only correspond between the website and your monitor if your modem is power cycled every night before 1 lpm, so the data you use during that day is actually accounted for on the website for that day.

Customers on our WiMax system are accounted for on a live usage basis, so what you see on the website will closely mirror what you have on a bandwidth monitor but usage is still accounted for on a 24hour period between 11PM and 11PM with data being updated to the website at 2.30AM.

The Falkland Islands Fire & Rescue Service Annual Fire Engine Pull 2009 takes place on Saturday November 28.


This year's pull will start from Government house at 14.00 hrs where the fire engine will be pulled down Ross Road to the Public Jetty.







Mariovision pioneers TV for Campers

WHILE government funded efforts to supply television to Camp residents have ground to a halt, broadcasting company KTV, known locally as Mariovision, has forged ahead and brought screens to life at some settlements in the North Camp area.

Sharon Zuvic, co-owner with husband Mario, said a signal which covers an area from Douglas station and surrounding farms to the East - and provides five digital channels - had been set up and running in little more than a week through a repeater station.

She said the cost had been relatively low as Mario and Luis had put together the repeater system themselves.

"This is similar to what we very recently proposed and quoted to FIG for the delivery of two or more channels for the government service," she said.

"It would have also made possible the delivery of all 17 KTV digital terrestrial channels in the same way."

The other areas of coverage would have been West of Sapper Hill to Fitzroy Ridge and most of Lafonia from Fitzroy to Goose Green.

Mrs Zuvic said they were looking to extend the service to these areas "as soon as it is technically and economically possible," and the rest of the Islands could follow after this.

"This has proved that the system can work in that area, and possibly in all of Camp, for a fraction of the figures quoted by Cllr Sawle at the public meeting," said Mrs Zuvic.

Cllr Sawle said it was his recollection that the cost of delivering an SSVC signal to the Camp was approximately £255,000 and £455,000 for Stanley. "It may be that the new councillors will take a look at the proposal KTV made for Camp and Stanley digital terrestrial and satellite TV distribution," she said.

"This shows with willingness, and a little effort, much can be achieved."

Stanley business G&S Electrical has been contracted to install the equipment for the government SSVC service. However, US suppliers of satellite dishes had failed to provide the necessary hardware, Cllr Sawle told the Penguin News.

He said the further delay was no fault of G&S Electrical. "It is the US suppliers who have let the whole thing down."

The project is "severely baulked," Cllr Sawle told the public meeting on Tuesday evening.

He revealed that at a meeting earlier in the day it was agreed alternative supplies should be sourced elsewhere.

"If anybody knows where we can buy 147 1.8 metre satellite dishes, complete with all the jiggly bits on the end to get the television, then please give us a shout. We're trying to get them as soon as possible, but it's not good," he said.

Even if everything were to fall into place, as far as deliveries and obtaining all the parts was concerned, the equipment would only arrive in May, and then an estimated ten week installation programme would follow.

Meanwhile KTV viewers in the Camp are enjoying a free trial period while tests are carried out on the system.

Camp customers are to be charged the same installation rate as Stanley customers and a reduced monthly rate in view of the fewer channels available, said Mrs Zuvic.

Dick Sawle was brimming with self-confidence and refreshingly straightforward. If he couldn't answer a question, he admitted he didn't know the answer. If he was asked a curly one – and Eric Goss tossed in a few – then he avoided potentially litigious repercussions by declining to identify individuals concerned.

Bill Luxton offered the best impression of a firebrand, particularly when he bemoaned the "crap" state of telecoms on the West, and Sharon Halford revealed she had already launched an email newsletter to circumnavigate the parlous state of radio reception.

It's rather ironic, don't you think, that West and East Falkland are divided by The Sound?

Soon the hardy annuals were being trotted out: the dubious state of roads, the shambles surrounding provision of TV to Camp, doubts over the veracity of planning for the proposed deepwater port, the controversial appointment of government superheads and the validity of the Islands Plan.


All were signalled as elementary concerns, and it will require considerable effort before any of them is satisfactorily addressed.

But I do not believe I was the only person in the room to feel a modicum of regret that Mike Summers was, for the first time in 12 years, relegated to the sidelines. He was the only person present from the previous Assembly, and his concern for the future path of his successors was apparent, albeit subtly delivered.

November 5 was a night of incredible change, and a remarkable display of trust by the electorate in appointing a brand new legislature. Let's hope those freshly elected will not forget the best efforts of those who have gone before them – and not be afraid to call upon their experience when needed. Because there will be times when they will need all the help they can get.

BFBS boss says Stanley is on target for May

BFBS station manager Stuart Holmes emphasised this week that parent company SSVC had "no part to play" in the procurement process for satellite dish hardware for distribution to Camp.

As reported on page one, the delivery of satellite dishes and associated hardware from a US supplier, for installation in Camp, has fallen through.

"We are, however, trying to find alternative suppliers in an attempt to assist the contractor with quicker lead times for the satellite dishes." Mr Holmes told the Penguin News, following Tuesday night's public meeting.

"The contract to deliver directto-home satellite systems to Camp viewers was issued as the result of an FIG tender process held earlier this year," he said.

"SSVC declined to tender and this contract was subsequently issued to a private sector, Stanleybased Company [G&S Electrical]."

He said SSVC's involvement with this contract was limited to:

• Issuing, (and agreeing) with the successful contractor, the technical specification of the satellite dishes and associate hardware

• Control of the Conditional Access viewing cards (Smart Cards)

• Supply of suitable satellite receivers

Training for the installation teams

However, SSVC is carrying out delivery of broadcast services into Stanley, and Mr Holmes said this project was currently at an advanced stage, with all hardware and infrastructure having been ordered from various suppliers.

"It should also be noted that the project costs discussed at the public meeting relating to delivery of SSVC services to Stanley include enhanced radio transmission, FIRS news services, FIRS distribution via satellite and the delivery of BFBS Radio 2 into Stanley via FM transmission. We are currently on-time and onbudget, with a predicted 'switchon' in May 2010."

New port advisory group will listen to stakeholders

COUNCILLOR Dick Sawle told a public meeting on Tuesday that a new port advisory group was shortly to be formed, made up of members of the Chamber of Commerce, the Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association (FIFCA), local mariners, a SAAS representative, various officials, himself, and Councillor Emma Edwards as the deputy portfolio holder.

The first meeting is scheduled for November 30. Cllr Sawle said he regarded it as very important because useful feedback from those who were likely to invest in the new port would be gained.

Fishing company owner Cheryl Roberts said the industry had not been involved in the process as intended, with only one stakeholders meeting being held in a year. Councillors and members of the public were in agreement.

Cllr Sawle, however, disagreed with another member of the public who suggested that the government should be funding the majority if not the whole port project.

"I think it's a big opportunity for the private sector. It's certainly a huge opportunity for the fishing industry to get involved and to add value to their produets, which also should add profits which should add the take to the Fałkland Islands Government.

"I disagree that government should be funding the whole port, but that's why we need to have the meeting of these interested parties to find out if they are also interested in funding it themselves in the private sector."

This week's cruise ships schedule

FIVE cruise ships are visiting the Falklands this week, with three calling into Stanley.

The Minerva (441 passengers) arrives at FIPASS today, with Veendam (1629 passengers) also due, calling into Stanley.

The Norwegian Sun will call into Stanley on Tuesday, with up to 2359 passengers. Kapitan Khlebnikov (108 passengers) will visit West Point on Thursday morning and New Island Settlement in the afternoon.

Also arriving on New Island on Thursday, is the Hanseatic (188 passengers) which is also scheduled to visit Carcass Island that day.

First swine flu death confirmed at inquest

THE first death as a result of swine flu in the Falklands was confirmed this week when the inquest into the death of a Stanley resident was closed by Coroner John Trevaskis.

Saint Helenian Ricardo Thoeodore Stevens (38) died at his home on Fitzroy Road in Stanley on July 27.

Mr Trevaskis said he was satisfied by the expert evidence of Dr Matthew Lyall following post mortem examination, that Mr Stevens was suffering from an infection of his lungs caused by the Inflenza A virus, and specifically the sub-type known as HIN1 (swine influenza).

Confirming the statement she had made soon after Mr Stevens" death, Mandy Lee said her fiancé had been suffering with flu like symptoms from July 16 and had visited the hospital on July 22 and 25 when he had been told to rest, take paracetamol and ensure he consumed plenty of fluids.

Ms Lee said Mr Steven's breathing had become irregular on the Saturday (July 25) but he had not returned to the hospital as she had suggested on the Sunday, as he felt it was a waste of time.

Early on the Monday (July 27), Ms Lee arranged a hospital appointment for 2.10pm that day.

She had woken Mr Stevens at 1.15pm to prepare for his appointment, but about five minutes later when she returned to his room she



found him unresponsive, and called the emergency services.

Medical staff at the scene administered cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) until 1.40pm when Chief Medical Officer Dr Roger Diggle pronounced Mr Stevens dend.

Speaking at the inquest on Tuesday. Dr Diggle said he was "desperately sorry for Mandy and her family.

He said it was unfortunate that Mr Stevens had died at home, as his family were left with the feeling that if things had been done differently the outcome might have changed.

He said there was a difficult balancing act to be achieved with seriously infectious diseases and

that the advice worldwide had been to treat swine flu at home where possible, so the risk of infecting other patients was reduced.

He explained that a system called CURB, based on levels of confusion, urea, respiratory and blood pressure was used to assess patients before hospitalisation.

During Mr Stevens' last visit to a doctor he had been considered well within the guidelines to be treated at home.

He said it was impossible to speculate what would have happened if Mr Stevens had been kept in hospital: "Everyone acted in good faith at the time and followed protocol."

Soon after Mr Stevens' death the medical department announced there had not been any deaths from swine flu in the Falklands.

Dr Diggle told the Penguin News this was because nose swab tests for swine flu carried out on Mr Stevens at the time had returned negative. He said the virus had been in Mr Stevens' lungs, but it had not become apparent until the post mortem results were received three weeks ago.

There was no intention to deliberately misinform the public," said Dr Diggle. He said the information had been received so long after the event there seemed no point in publicising it prior to the inquest being concluded.

Yachtie ahoy

A LONE yachtsman is setting sail for the Falklands next month in a hid to become the first Indian to circumnavigate the world alone. Commander Dilip Dhonde (42) of the Indian Navy, reached New Zealand on Saturday, after beginning his voyage in Mumbai on August 19. He will spend a total of nine months at sea, stopping at only four ports - Fremantle, Christchurch, Stanley and Cape Town - before returning to Mumbai. He begins his leg to Stanley on December 6.

Chile was next target if the Falklands had fallen

HAD Argentina won the Falklands War, their next target was Chile, according to a former chief of the Argentine Air Force.

Retired Brigadier Basilio Lami Dozo, the last surviving member of the military Junta headed by General Leopoldo Fortunato Galtieri, this week also revealed he had personally requested the Chilean Air Force commander not to send aircraft with offensive capacity to the south of the Falklands, during the '82 conflict.

Falklands, during the '82 conflict. "He behaved quite well," said Lami Dozo. "Not so the Chilean Navy and the Chilean Army which were decisively in favour of Great Britain."

He also said that in 1978 he was commissioned to personally negotiate with Chilean dictator, Augusto Pinochet, the border dispute over three islands in the Beagle Channel, at the south of the continent, which had both countries on the verge of an anned conflict. This was halted, when tanks had already begun rolling, only by the direct intervention of then Pope John Paul II.

The Vatican mediation headed by Cardinal Antonio Samoré, finally granted the three small uninhabited islands to Chile. A conclusion which was overwhelmingly accepted by the Argentine electorate in a referendum held in 1984, when Argentina had returned to democracy.

Lami Dozo insisted in the planned conflict with Chile he never gave the support of the Argentine Air Force to the belligerent position of the more radical "hawks" in the Army and Navy, and that his position all

along had been to request the papal mediation.

"I wasn't sure we could win." he told the Buenos Aires daily Perfil. "I told those in the Army that the Chilean Armed Forces would give us a tremendous blow at the beginning and could easily reach Rio Gallegos.

"Obviously, with time Argentina, which is larger and stronger, would force them back to the Andes. But yes, it was going to cost a lot of money and lives."

According to the original plan, code named Rosario, following the capture of the Falklands and no reaction or limited reaction from Britain, the Argentine military would have moved to take control of the Beagle Channel Islands, seen as strategically important for access between the Atlantic and Pacific.

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Police chief leaves with pride and some dismay

FALKLANDS Chief Police Officer Paul Elliott leaves the Islands today, disappointed at being unable to see the end results of some of his work, but proud of having lifted the service to higher levels.

Superintendent Elliott was made redundant earlier this month, two years into his original three year contract, as part of the Chief Executive's Review of Government. Under the review, the post of Chief Police Officer was disestablished to be superceded by a Director of Community of Safety.

This newly established "super head" position includes responsibilities as Chief Police Officer, Officer in Charge of the Prison. Principal Immigration Officer; as well as director level responsibility for Fire and Rescue, Customs and Immigration and the Falkland Islands Defence Force.

Gary Finchett, currently a Chief Superintendent with Cheshire Police, working as Divisional Commander in Warrington, is due to take up the new post on January 6.

Supt Elliott joined the Royal Falkland Islands Police (RFIP) in September 2007 after 30 years service with Lincolnshire Police.

He conducted a review of RFIP which identified 52 areas for improvement, and a timetable was drawn up to implement them by September next year, which coincided with the end of his original contract.

"I am naturally disappointed that having invested so much time and personal energy into identifying areas for improvement and

change. I will not be in a position to see everything completed and put into place," he said.

But he was pleased with a number of achievements, including the renovation of the old police station, completion of the new prison annexe, and a number of internal changes which had been made to "professionalise police procedures."

"Skills in investigation and interviewing have been improved through training in interview techniques, and interviewing for vulnerable victims and witnesses," he said.

"I am also pleased to have improved community policing through listening to the public, seeking to identify their priorities and concerns and providing increased foot patrols and greater police involvement in schools and the wider community.

"As I leave, community policing is set to be further enhanced through allocation of area beats to named officers and by allocating personal responsibility to named officers for specific topics, including local businesses, faith groups and voluntary organisations, children and youth organisations, licensed premises, road safety, Camp and tourism."

When asked about the recent changes to the structure of the police leading to his redundancy, Supt Elliott said: "It is my belief that well established, tried and tested common sense community policing is needed on the Islands.

But he added: "It remains to be seen if the latest cutting edge management theories will enhance the service RFIP is currently able to provide and whether they will stand the test of time.

"Although my time as Chief Officer has not been without incident or challenges. I am pleased that I have been able to press through and purge the force of several historic issues and move forward so that my successor will inherit a much improved, more professional and more capable police service than it was when I first arrived."

He said although his time in the Islands had "sometimes been stressful," he and his wife Alison would look back with fond memories of good friendships and happy times which far outweighed any negative experiences.

He thanked the Governor and friends and colleagues who had provided support and encouragement, and helped make his time on the Islands a memorable experience.

Q IS IT true that the group of Zimbabweans recruited to clear mines in the Falklands have no previous experience and are undergoing a long period of training locally before embarking on their dangerous mission? If so, surely there has been a "slip-up" somewhere?

A Project Manager of BACTEC. Roger Gagen, provided this response.

ALL the Zimbabwean deminers have been employed on a number of demining projects by BACTEC and have extensive demining and EOD experience.

EOD experience. The 33 BACTEC Zimbabwean demining Staff have collectively 326 years demining experience between them, averaging 11 years of clearance experience each. They have all worked in many different countries clearing mines and Unexploded ordnance (UXO), including Africa, the Middle East and various other locations. Their most recent experience was the clearance of some 16 minefields in Lebanon in 2008.

All BACTEC staff are required to undertake refresher/update training prior to starting work to ensure they are fully conversant with the types of mines they will be dealing with, the prevailing ground conditions, the environment and the equipment they will be using.

The BACTEC teams/individuals have all been accredited to International Mine Action Standards by the UN on previous projects and before deploying on the clearance tasks in the Falkland Islands will undergo formal assessment and accreditation by the Demining Project Office.

This is a contractual requirement to ensure that only suitably qualified and experienced staff are employed on clearance operations.

For the Falkland Island project BACTEC has deployed two former Royal Engineer Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) Warrant Officers to manage the project.

Roger Gagen, Project Manager, with 23 years experience, served as a military engineer twice on the Islands as a member of the EOD detachment and subsequently eight years experience in civilian mine and UXO clearance.

Kevin Bryant, Operations Manager, served for 25 years as a Royal Engineer serving in the Falklands as Q Mines twice, originally for 12 months and then for a 16 month term. He has subsequently gained ten years of experience in civilian mine and UXO clearance. Our team also includes three Zimbabwean trauma medics and one Malawian trauma medic.

HOW were an Argentine couple able to arrive in the Falklands on a Saturday and get married here on a Monday, despite not having lived in the "parish" prior to their marriage, as required by law?

Was their notification of marriage posted on the Registrar's notice board and, if so, was it stated that they were residing in Argentina?

Who signed the marriage notification certificate, the bride or groom or a third party, and if so whom?

A Registrar General, John Rowland, provided the following answer.

AT present the Falkland Islands have two options for marriage

The first is the 21-day rule where the "notice of marriage" form is posted on the Registrar General's Notice Board for 21 days. After which time the Registrar General issues the licence and marriage certificates. For this option the couple have to be resident in the Falkland Islands for not less than seven days for each of the parties. The second option is to be married by "special licence" and is available for people who are unable to satisfy the period of residence. No notice of marriage form or 21 days' notice applies to a special licence.

However, people must submit in English a statutory declaration containing all personal details and place of residence and mention that they are not married or related by blood.

They must also supply passport details and a copy of a utility bill and contact numbers. If the couple are non - English speaking they will have to get the declaration translated and have the documents certified.

Applications for special licences are made to the Registrar General under the Marriage Ordinance 1996, who checks, prepares and produces the paperwork for the Attorney General and the final signing of the special licence by the Governor

The Argentine couple referred to applied for a special licence in accordance with the Marriage Ordinance 1996 and provided a very detailed and accurate application.

Military top brass celebrate a job well done in South Georgia

Tony Curran reports on HMS Gloucester's recent visit to South Georgia, the final task in its six month South Atlantic deployment.

THE Falklands military top brass last week returned from an 11-day patrol to South Georgia to declare a job well done by the Navy's key watchdog in the South Atlantic.

HMS Gloucester, supported by RFA Gold Rover, spent six days in the territory as part of its mission to maintain deterrence across the region and to test its own warfare capabilities through a series of seagoing exercises.

It was the Gloucester's first visit to Grytviken, home to three government officers, a handful of summer season staff at the museum and shop, and eight yearround personnel at the British Antarctic Survey base at nearby King Edward Point.

A number of Falkland Islanders also were working there when both ships dropped anchor.

Brian Summers was conducting a weed-killing project, Steve Massam was on a six-week assignment to assist museum staff, and David Peck and Christian Berntsen were part of the team helping maintain the remnants of the whaling station, preserved as a monument to the industry upon which the island once thrived.

Nowadays, ecology, conservation and protection of wildlife are among the top priorities for both the government and BAS, not only to preserve the island's integrity as a pristine wilderness, but also to ensure visiting cruise liners continue to pump around £4 million a year into the tiny economy.

But while the Gloucester's role was passive, she still had plenty of work on her plate, including the disposal of ordnance, most of which was left behind by the British military post-1982.

An Explosive Ordnance Demolition team from MPA was dispatched to blow up suspect ammunition on the hills surrounding Grytviken, an operation overseen by Government Officer Pat Lurcock, based in South Georgia since 1992.

On the north eastern coast of the island the Gloucester undertook a series of aerial glacial surveys, which scientists hope will help further identify the effects of global warming, often first evident on the edge of Antarctica.

Georgina Strange, from New Island, was recruited as ship's photographer for the patrol: "It has been incredible," she said. "The survey was a request from South Georgia Government to take a photographic record of the glacial changes, and it also gave me a privi-

leged opportunity to take photographs of stunning landscapes. It was an absolutely amazing experience."

Also on board was Falkland's senior magistrate John Trevaskis, who met with government officers currently redrafting legislation for the first time since South Georgia ceased to become a dependency of the Falklands in 1985.

"I was delighted to have the opportunity to visit this unique and beautiful part of my jurisdiction, and to meet the government officers," said Mr Trevaskis. "I look forward to assisting the government in their legislative review, and to supporting the administration of justice there during the remainder of my appointment."

Commander Adam Lunn, in charge of Joint Operations in the MPA HQ, was another among the 21 military and civilian guests invited to join the patrol. He told the Penguin News: "The distance of South Georgia from the Falkland Islands makes the mariime operational patrols invaluable in terms of maintaining our military presence in support of our broader mission in the South Atlantic.

"At the same time it's an enormous privilege to be able to visit such a unique and remote part of the world. We're clearly happy to assist with the ongoing EOD work and we're immensely grateful to South Georgia Government and the British Antarctic Survey for their continued support of our operations here."

HMS Gloucester returned to Stanley at the weekend, and is soon to hand over to her successor in the South Atlantic, HMS York.

Commander British Forces Air Commodore Gordon Moulds, who travelled on Gold Rover and attended a service of remembrance at Grytviken Chapel, said: "The South Georgia joint patrol was an important exercise for the Navy and the wider British Forces of the British South Atlantic Islands, and a vital link for the small community at Grytviken. Exercises such as this not only demonstrate our ability to mount and sustain such military operations but also clearly shows the British Government's long term commitment to the governments of both the Falkland Islands and South Georgia." Cdr Iain Lower, Captain of HMS Gloucester, said he was "extremely pleased" with the success of the patrol.

"The officers and ship's company of both HMS Gloucester and RFA Gold Rover have put in a lot of hard work and effort in both planning and executing this operation.

"Patrols such as this are an essential part of our role in supporting the wider Falklands theatre of operations and also enabled us to offer practical assistance to our friends in South Georgia.

"This has been a particularly special patrol for us, not only to carry out surveys and conduct seagoing exercises, but also to complete this year's deployment in such a spectacular environment.

"We have been proud to serve the Falklands and the South Atlantic over the past six months and will take away many happy memories of our time in the Falkland Islands."

Explosive dangers still lurking beneath a pristine wilderness

THERE was a military presence here in Grytviken from 1982 through until 2001, when we rebuilt the infrastructure and the British Antarctic Survey moved in, so during all those years the Army used to do light firing exercises.

There are big open spaces, no farmers and no sheep that you could upset, and they had a fantastic opportunity with no one really to say you shouldn't be doing that. So they used to go out and fire mortars and guns all over the place, and do the practicing that an army has to do.

But the problem is that there are shells, mortars and bullets now left strewn across the countryside, some of which haven't gone off.

Most of it has but we're not qualified :0 make the call. So we just have to mark them, and over the last year or so we discovered another six pieces of ordnance, just as people were out walking up in the hills. One part of my job is to educate people and say if you find anything don't

touch it, report it to me. So we've logged all Pat Lurcock on HMS Gloucester these things, and about once a year the EOD guys

come down and we take them around and find all the bits and they blow them up.

Three EOD guys and the medic from the Gloucester came over today. Obviously, they need to have medical cover when they're doing that.

We found a smoke grenade, and we found most of the other items. We took them up to a pit way

up in the valley. It's well away from any wildlife and it's not a

There's one more shell which I think is probably left over from the British Navy bombardment in 1982. It's something I think that is too big for the guys stationed here to have used, and from the photographs we sent them they think it could still be live.

We didn't have time to get at that one today because it was at a point where I needed to make the call whether we were going to go

for it. But we had another two inches of snow this morning, it was blizzarding hard and it would have just been silly going up in nil visibility.

It's a shame these things are out there, but it's great that we've got an arrangement with the British forces in the Falklands, and they come down once a year. When they built the base here

the EOD sent a team of guys down with some special mine detecting gear. They gridded it all out and marched up and down and checked King Edward Point was clear.

Then they extended that around Grytviken and the general areas where we normally operate. and where the tourists all come.

And it's really because we have so many people who like getting out every now and again, walking up in the hills and finding a slightly different route.

We don't have footpaths, and that's another one of the beauties here. There isn't a right way to go from A to B, so you're always taking a different route. Every now and then someone's going to find something, and they know to mark its position and let me know.

It's another part of cleaning the place up and leaving it as wild and natural as possible.



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The Falklands and the EU

THE EU Green Paper and recent Communication sets out a number of issues for consideration in the future long term relationship between the EU and Overseas Territories. The current EU OCT Decision extends until December 2013 and a consultation process has begun on its replacement. To a significant extent this results from OCTs and their Member States telling the EU that the relationship between the EU and the OTs offers little protection and delivers little assistance to OCTs in terms of political, social and economic development, or environmental protection. The Green Paper and the new Communication begin to chart which way this new relationship will develop.

The Falkland Islands Perspective

The Falklands can be characterised in a number of different ways, but the key features are:

- restricted communications and transportation
- ---- an aggressive Argentine sovereignty claim
- -- narrow economic base dependent on natural resources
- small population
- of considerable ecological interest and importance
- European political infrastructure and standards
- underdeveloped physical infrastructure

What might a closer relationship with the European Community do to further assist, or to undermine, the economic, social and cultural development to which we aspire? Some of the key questions to consider are these...

Self-determination and internal self government

Would the greater control over our lives that we have struggled to achieve be compromised in a new relationship? Greater autonomy should not necessarily preclude fuller participation in the EU (viz. Gibraltar, Scotland, Wales and the new EU members); nor should a closer relationship necessarily imply any loss of internal controls. But what current delegations might we be required to give up or compromise? Control of immigration is an obvious concern; loss of control over social policies and employment law, for example, would be a concern.

Foreign affairs and defence

These are the two main areas in which Member States currently reserve competence. However, following the implementation of the Lisbon Treaty and the creation of the new Foreign Affairs commission, further commonality is inevitable. Would a closer EU/OCT relationship provide the Falklands with more protection from one of the world's major power bases, or might it lead to unacceptable compromise on our political position? This is perhaps the most important single issue to be debated.

The EU legal framework

A "reciprocal partnership" is proposed and it is suggested that the adoption of EU legislation and policies would be voluntary. Would cooperation in EU policies provide a framework for greater economic cooperation to help reduce our isolation, and would it help us for the EU to see us as not a developing third country, but as a partner in a more mature sense?

EU development assistance

A country as tiny as ours cannot survive alone, and the EU is already our major trade partner. To obtain more assistance to deal with structural issues we need to move to a different type of relationship with the EU that specifically addresses a) remoteness from the EU; b) cost of transport and communications; c) diseconomies of scale; and d) poor infrastructure. It is clear that this cannot be achieved under the existing political framework. There will be a new relationship – the issue for us is how to help shape it in a positive fashion.

Fiscal policy

We have already seen substantial pressure brought to bear on OCTs in areas of fiscal control, in particular tax policy, which in the end OCTs are powerless to resist. It is not currently clear whether fiscal controls might be implemented in other areas which are not necessarily in our best interest.

Centres of excellence

The EU has expressed an interest in the OCTs as centres of excellence. Could we in partnership and co-operation become a centre of excellence in fisheries management, renewable energy generation, and/or environmental protection and management?

Mike Summers

Our obligation to actively pursue a new relationship

FORMER councillor Mike Summers presents an overview of the European Union Green Paper on the Overseas Territories (opposite), and argues the new Legislative Assembly should lead the debate on the future relationship between the Falklands and its European cousins.

THESE are important political issues that will have far reaching and long term consequences for the Falkland Islands. In the end we may not have complete (or very much) control over which routes are taken – there will be views from other stakeholders, that could differ widely.

The Falklands cannot sit quietly by and allow others to shape our future.

Whether we want (or can afford) to remain largely independent of other trans-national organisations and make our own way in life, or try to join up to one of the largest economic and political forces in the modern world, should



positive debate and discussion. The Legislative Assembly has a responsibility to lead this debate and to engage the public in

be a matter of

considering the future relationship with Europe. The UK is our sponsor in these discussions; it is regularly perceived as being less involved and less committed to the European Community than many other Member States, and in respect of the OCT as favouring the status quo over new arrangements.

Because of the potential benefits to the Falkland Islands of a different relationship with the European Community, we should urge the UK Government not to rule out any of the options available, and to actively explore what options realistically exist to help achieve the economic, social and cultural development to which we all aspire.







Mr Rendell promised a "really unique evening's entertainment."



Ocean Guardian oil rig sets out on 62 day journey

A TUG boat set sail on Tuesday to haul a North Sea oil and gas exploration rig from a Highlands deep water port on its 62-day journey to the Falkland Islands.

The Ocean Guardian rig will be used by Desire Petroleum to explore reserves in the North Falkland Basin.

Its owner Diamond Offshore Drilling told BBC Online the length of the trip from Invergordon on the Cromarty Firth could change if there was bad weather.

The tug Maersk Traveller is expected to begin the operation later this week

Fifty-seven personnel will be involved in moving the 24-yearold Glasgow-built semi-submersible rig.

Ocean Guardian is part of Diamond Offshore's fleet of 47 rigs, and was previously used in the North Sea.

The company expects the semi-submersible to remain off the Islands until next August, when it

would be towed back to the Cromarty Firth.

The Cromarty Firth is used for anchoring rigs so they can be overhauled and prepared for new operations.

UK company Desire Petroleum estimates potential oil reserves in the North Falkland Basin could exceed 3.5 billion barrels and more than nine trillion cubic feet of gas. In 1998 six wells were drilled


to the north of the Islands that revealed the presence of a rich organic source rock that could hold up to 60 billion barrels of oil.

As agreed at the club AGM, unless there are any objections to the rules and constitution the club will affiliate to FIGA once formed.





Economy catches cold as cruise bug strikes

THE last minute cancellation of the Norwegian Sun has cost the Falklands economy upwards of £100,000, and agents fear the reputation of the Islands as a destination could be damaged.

Tour operators would have earned around £60,000 and the government about £45,000 through harbour dues, customs clearance and landing fees.

The Nowegian Sun had earlier in the week reported 118 cases of diarrhoea and vomiting. The ship and its 1,851 passengers was turned away after Chief Medical Officer Dr Roger Diggle decided the risk of infection for the local population was too high.

On Monday the ship reported it had 12-13 passengers kept in isolation.

When Dr Diggle spoke to the ship's doctor by telephone early on Tuesday he was told a further three cases had developed overnight. He said on that basis he felt the infection was ongoing and therefore carried a risk to the general public.

Dr Diggle said the situation sounded like a condition called norovirus, which is highly contagious. He said: "It's not a terribly serious thing. It causes diarrhoea and vomiting for 24-48 hours and makes people quite ill. But it is exceptionally infectious and so goes through populations like a dose of salts."

The ship was doing the right thing and numbers were going down, said Dr Diggle. He said if the Norwegian Sun had arrived on Wednesday or Thursday it would probably have been passed as fit.

But John Pollard, manager of Sulivan Shipping, the Norwegian Sun's agent, said he was "absolutely astonished at the rationale behind the decision to turn the ship away."

He said he had spoken to the Norwegian Crown Line senior management who were "flabber-



gasted" at the move and had never heard of a vessel being turned away from any port worldwide because of gastroenteritis.

There was nothing other than Dr Diggle's assumption to indicate that it was norovirus, said Mr Pollard, adding that with 3,000 passengers and crew there would always be someone ill with something.

One tour operator told the Penguin News it was his opinion the government decision was made far too late on Tuesday morning. He said: "Not to permit passengers from the Norwegian Sun to come ashore is a financial disaster for the Falkland Island tourism economy. It may also be a public relations disaster with the passengers and the cruise company."

Mr Pollard echoed his statement, saying: "We could have seriously shot ourselves in the foot."

The tour operator said: "The

objective must be to make sure that this does not happen again. There is a meeting between private sector representatives and FIG officials on Friday [today].

Each has been mooted over the past couple of weeks as being the name behind The Beak, a blogger who has stirred much mirth around some quarters since his (or her) commentaries have been published on the net.

1 am told there once existed in the Falklands a similarly minded proponent of subversively directed barbs at local figures of authority – for it is to them that much of The Beak's subtle vitriol seems to be directed.

His or her identity also was never discovered, as they built a not inconsiderable reputation under the moniker of The Goose News. If the two are related, it would make a wonderful story, because they certainly share the desire to thumb their noses at the establishment.

And that has to be admired, in any democracy which respects freedom of speech. Even if, as The Beak proclaims, they are "regurgitating half-digested current events to the Falklands' fledgling population." It's nice to welcome you. Whoever you are.

Cancellation a huge loss to all

GENERAL Manager of Falkland Islands Company and President of the Chamber of Commerce, Roger Spink, is seeking assurances to prevent future cruise ship cancellations following a virus being reported on the Norwegian Sun.

"The Chamber of

Commerce and Tourist Board, with agents Sulivan Shipping Ltd, are looking into what procedures are taken elsewhere in the world," he said.

"We hope that if everyone works together we can improve how we as the Falkland Islands approach such incidents in future.

"We have asked FIG what advice if any has been received by them on how other destinations handle such matters."

Mr Spink said acting Chief Executive Keith Padgett was setting up a meeting to establish a clear procedure which he hoped would be in place before the next large vessel visited.

Dr Roger Diggle said the risk to the Falklands was high because the nature of the tours and the wide variety of vehicles used, offered little possibility of adequately



controlling any infection, and there was every prospect the virus would spread: "If this occurred, then when the next cruise ship arrives there is every possibility that the passengers could become infected from vehicles and establishments on shore and

thus create another ship with norovirus," he said.

However, having got up at the erack of dawn to prepare for visiting tour groups, Glenda Watson at Long Island Farm was less than happy with the late decision.

She said if Dr Diggle had made the decision earlier it could have saved a lot of effort for those preparing for the day.

Kevin Kilmartin said his Bluff Cove team was at the Lagoon ready and looking forward to entertaining the Norwegian Sun passengers when they received the call saying she was cancelled.

"It is a huge loss to everybody concerned and particularly disappointing as NCL (Norwegian Cruise Line) is our best customer, visiting most frequently during the season. We feel for all those passengers who missed out."

No time to inform earlier

DR Roger Diggle said he was first informed of the problem on the Norwegian Sun at 8.15am on Tuesday.

He asked the ship's doctor to phone him, which was attempted but failed. Dr Diggle then phoned the ship at 8.50am and told the Customs and Immigration department at about 9am that passengers should not disembark.

"I understand the Maritime Declaration of Health was sent by the agent to the customs department late on the previous afternoon after the end of normal working hours. The declaration was therefore not seen or actioned until beginning of work on Tuesday," said Dr Diggle. "This then resulted in extreme time pressures in order to make decisions in the morning, given I had other commitments."

He said had the information been available to him the previous day then all the tourist industry could have been forewarned: "In my view the correct decision was taken.

"It is regrettable that many people were inconvenienced on the morning of the event. With a bit more thought and possibly altered out of hours arrangements from other organisations, the decisions could have been taken much earlier."

Seven cruise ships calling

SEVEN cruise ships are visiting the Falklands this week, with five calling into Stanley.

The Clipper Adventurer (118 passengers) is due at West Point this morning and Saunders Island this afternoon. The Kapitan Khlebnikov (102) visits West Point this morning and Saunders this afternoon. The Hanseatic (137) will visit Stanley from 8am until 2pm. The Kapitan Khlebnikov visits Stanley tomorrow, along with the Clipper Adventurer and NG Explorer (131). The NG Explorer visits Carcass Island and New Island on Sunday.

On Tuesday Le Diamant (226) visits New Island and Grave Cove, and on Wednesday the Corinthian II (120) will call into Stanley.

On Thursday the Corinthian II visits Saunders in the morning and West Point in the afternoon. The Silver Cloud (296) will be in Stanley from 9am to 6pm.

Argentine department dedicated to interfere

ARGENTINA has protested the inclusion of the Falklands among the overseas territories listed in the European Union Lisbon Treaty, which came into effect on Tuesday.

The treaty is designed to streamline EU decision-making, which includes cooperation and economic and for overseas territories such as the Falklands.

But the Argentine Foreign Affairs ministry has instructed its embassies in the EU to again attempt to reaffirm its claim of sovereignty over the Islands.

Councillor Jan Cheek said such moves were "ridiculous," and that some Argentine civil servants were dedicated to interfering in Falkland Islands affairs on the international stage: "They do have, apparently, a large department in their Foreign Affairs service, which just seems to look out for every possible meeting, forum, association, where we may pop up – and they protest.

"They've been doing it for years. If it's an international forum and the Argentines are also involved, we can usually get by if we're part of a British delegation. "But if we're there in our own

right, they object. It's ridiculous." Argentine President Cristina

Kirchner was this week reported as saying the sovereignty issue would be "paramount" at next year's Ibero-American summit, which Argentina will host.

Relationships between the Falklands and Britain will be top of the agenda for Cllr Dick Sawle next week when he attends the 11th meeting of the Overseas Territories Consultative Council in London.

Clir Sawle said: "It will be good to meet and discuss issues of mutual interest face to face with the Foreign Office." CREW of the Tamar escaped serious injury on Monday night after the container ship Hurst Point broke free from its moorings and slammed into the cargo vessel at Mare Harbour.

Owner of the Tamar. Captain Heather Chaplin, is thought to have been onboard the vessel at the time along with eight other crew members.

Accounts from those on board say the stern of the Hurst Point narrowly missed the wheelhouse of the Tamar while photographs of the vessel show several areas of substantial damage.

Crew were understood to have been "shell-shocked" after hurriedly leaving the wheelhouse to assess the damage.

A military spokesperson said the incident was the result of an unexpected storm which blew up that night.

She said it was a "minor incident" and was under control as

quickly as possible in the conditions.

She said there were no casualties, the relevant authorities were called and attended the berthing area at Mare Harbour at the time, and the incident was under investigation.

Airfares may backfire

Crew escapes

THIS week's rise in Airbridge fares could backfire against the MoD, according to Councillor Jan Cheek.

All fares were raised on Tuesday, with the adult return fare, set at £1350 on April 1, increasing to £1550, and the child and student return fare, set at £675 eight months ago, rising to £853.

Cllr Cheek said the move was "very disappointing," although she said the price increase could have been worse.

The Falklands Government had no involvement at the last meeting called to discuss the airfares which, she said, gave FIG "no room for manoeuvre."

Clir Check said the situation was very difficult, because raising the fares to cover the cost of some seats not being filled could potentially encourage more people to seek other routes to the UK.

She said the MoD was under pressure to cut costs, which would have contributed to this decision: "I think it's the kind of restraints that they're under at the moment. They are hugely over-stretched because of their commitments in Afghanistan."

Director of Procurement and Efficiency, Andrew Lee, said prices would be reviewed again in October 2010, along with the number of scheduled flights.

"The main reason for the increase has been an overall under utilisation of Airbridge seats coinciding with increase in the price of fuel," said Mr Lee.

Pensions bonus

PENSIONERS will receive their Christmas bonus automatically this year, after Standing Finance Committee last week reversed the requirement for bonuses to be applied for. Councillor Jan Cheek said the decision to overturn the ruling by the former Legislative Assembly was the right one because "those who probably needed it most were least likely to apply." Anyone who does not wish to receive the payment should contact the Treasury.

Drink driving

DAVID Phillips was disqualified from driving for 12 months and fined a total of £470 in the Senior Magistrates Court on Wednesday. Mr Phillips pleaded guilty to the offence, which took place on Tuesday. Crown Council Elliott Taylforth said he was reported by a member of the public and a breathalyser produced a reading of 61 mg of alcohol in 100ml of blood, almost twice the legal limit.

Governor dies

FORMER Governor of the Falkland Islands James Parker CMG OBE has passed away. He died peacefully at home on November 17. He was 89 years old. A cremation and thanksgiving service took place last Wednesday in Salisbury. Mr Parker was Governor of the Falklands between 1976 and 1980.

FIFCA to face stock and fee challenges

STUART Wallace, who was this week re-elected chairman of the Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association (FIFCA), says the industry is facing challenging times ahead.

He pinpointed two significant issues: the first, a review of the fees which are paid by members for fishing quotas.

"There's a major review under way which is funded by the industry and by the FIG equally. We have some consultants arriving next week," he said.

"That process is going to go on and finish in about May next year. It's a substantial amount of work for all concerned so that's a really important issue - critical to people in the industry who pay the fees and also equally important to government for the Falkland Treasury."

The second issue, he said, was the state of the fishing stocks, with both ilex and salamander whiting under threat. Although Mr Wallace did admit there was some way to go before coming to a decision on stocks, he said the issue was compounded by the "unwillingness" of Argentina to be responsible in discussing the preservation of fishing stocks.

ing stocks. "The controlled manner in which we manage our fishery is negated by the irresponsibility of Argentina." he said. FIFCA also agreed to introduce

FIFCA also agreed to introduce the post of executive secretary of the association, a position which would serve as FIFCA's contact point "and in some ways the manager of our association's business."

Also elected onto the board were Cheryl Roberts as deputy chairman, alongside Drew Irvine, Mike Forrest and Lewis Clifton.

Typhoon damaged in a 'minor' air incident

THE RAF is investigating a "minor incident" involving one of the new Typhoon Euro fighter jets over the Falklands last week.

Minor damage was discovered on the Typhoon shortly after it had completed an in-flight refuelling sortie with a VC10 on Thursday.

"A minor incident involving a Typhoon and VC10 occurred," said the UK Ministry of Defence.

"There were no casualties. However, both aircraft sustained damage."

A military source said the crews of both aircraft were unaware of any contact being made during the flight. The damage was noticed only after the aircraft returned to Mount Pleasant Airport and had been inspected by ground engineers.

"An investigation into the cause of the incident is ongoing,"

the MoD added. "Until this is completed, we remain unsure whether there was any contact between the two aircraft."

Three Typhoons were believed to have been airborne during the training sortie.

The RAF flew four Typhoons to the Falklands in September, the first to replace a longstanding detachment of Tornado F3 fighters in providing quick reaction alert cover for the Islands. Dubbed Operation "Tempest Trail," the deployment spanned a distance of almost 14,500km.

It involved a total of ten support aircraft, including Lockheed TriStar and VC10 tankers and Lockheed C-130K transports.

Each Typhoon was required to refuel in-flight seven times during transit.



Final exercise completed as new mine clearance gets underway

DEMINING got underway this week at Surf Bay where the BACTEC team have various land types to deal with, not least a vast area of sand dunes.

The sand dunes are to be literally "sieved" to remove any ordnance and then reshaped to form the coastline again, and will be the most challenging part of the operation said Robin Swanson, the demining programme manager.

The demining programme officers oversee the work carried out by demining contractors BACTEC, ensuring it is conducted within the International Mine Action Standards as well as the national standards agreed and signed by the Falklands Government and the Foreign and Commonwealth Office

As the accreditation process drew to a close last week an emergency evacuation exercise was held to test the response of the staff on site as well as the local emergency services.

Chief Medical Officer Dr Roger Diggle was on the scene to monitor the exercise, although the other services and those responding to the call had no idea an exercise was planned.

The Zimbabwean demining team demonstrated the process used to search for mines within a safe area in typical Falklands vegetation near Surf Bay.

The undergrowth in a one metre wide lane and half a metre in front of the deminer is trimmed away using hedge cutters before being scanned with a metal detector and probed to a depth of ten centimetres. This layer is then carefully removed and placed behind the deminer before a further layer of the same depth is scanned and probed.

The exercise got underway at 2pm when, at a signal from Guy Marot, the demining programme technical advisor, a deminer let out a yell and threw himself over the staked out area and partially into what was the "uncleared mined area."

The scenario was that he had lost his right hand, would initially be conscious and screaming before lapsing into unconsciousness and his heart stopping. The "casualty" was moved

The "casualty" was moved into the safe area by his workmates and his "injuries" assessed within minutes. But for those of us observing, it seemed to take a long time for the trauma medics to reach the scene, although it was logged at just seven minutes.

What I wasn't aware of was

troceeds will be given to the Falldards Veterins Foundation and the Lighthouse Seuman's Centre. that the large rucksack he carried weighed 25 kgs with oxygen equipment, and they were a lot further from the site than would be allowed in a "real time" situation.

A 999 call was logged by the police station at 2.12 pm and the information had been passed to the demining office at 12.14 pm.

Police were on the scene at 2.15 pm at which point the pulse and breathing were deemed to be regular and the casualty was transferred to the ambulance.

Mr Swanson said overall it was a positive, efficiently conducted exercise that had brought up a number of minor issues that needed to be worked on. Dr Diggle said he was impressed with the medics' work, although the time allocated for inserting a line [drip] into the casualty had been "optimistic."

This was backed up by BACTEC's operations manager Kevin Bryant who had himself been injured by a mine. He said: "It took 15 attempts to get a line in to me, it wouldn't happen that quick in reality."

While it is hoped the reaction times will never be tested outside of an exercise, the response had been excellent, said Mr Swanson. Sharon Jaffray





He also expanded on the importance of breeding fast growing, early maturing cattle that meet the Meat Company carcass specifications at young ages.

The NBH cattle are Angus, selected because of their many characteristics that suit the Islands' farming system and the relatively harsh conditions under which cattle are fattened.

Among other considerations they are easy calvers, have fast growth and fattening rates and are polled. Some farmers are able to finish genetically superior Angus at around 20 months old to provide tasty, young beef for Stanley, MPA and other consumers. Everyone then braved the howling

wind and showers to discuss and view the NBH animals at the cattle yards. The impressive mature bulls were on display as well as two-year-old heifers, yearling heifers and bulls.

Various growth performance data pertaining to the animals was also on display, including 200 and 400 day weights, pedigrees and, for the bulls, testicular circumference measurements which link to both fertility of the bulls and their female progeny. As Mac pointed out, big is best in this department.

Grazing management was next on the agenda, organised and led by Andy Pollard, who started off with a presentation and talk about the reasoning behind managed intensive grazing.

Mention was made of the management techniques taught by the visiting expert in this field. Jim Gerrish, who has visited the Islands twice in the past few years and held very successful seminars on the subject. Once the talk was concluded, everyone leapt into their vehicles and followed a trail around various paddocks to look at spots of interest.

One thing I was very surprised to learn was that one of the managed grazing plots had a vibrantly healthy community of the rare, yellow pale maidens. It appears that the grazing pressure they have been subjected to has not at all diversely affected this plant; quite the opposite in fact.

The plots showed a high diversity of both native pasture and introduced species, some selected for their high nutritive qualities and others because of their nitrogen fixing abilities.

The trail eventually wound back to the road and it was on to the final part of the day which was focused on the National Polwarth Stud Flock (NSF) with a number of rams on display in the shearing shed. But first, everyone thawed out over a much-needed cuppa and sampled the delights of the barbecue that Sarah Bowles. Sian Ferguson and Diana Aldridge had slaved over all morning. The takings from the barbecue, after expenses were donated, went to charity. Well done, ladies, it was a marvellous feast.

lan Campbell and Tony Mills held a talk and discussion session on the NSF using the mature and shearling rams which were on display to illustrate relative points.

An interesting point from this session was that obtaining new and unrelated Polwarth genetics from anywhere in the world was becoming increasingly difficult each year, and the DoA was now at a point where decisions would have to be made as to the future genes to be introduced to meet the requirements for dual purpose rams by farmers throughout the Islands.

The day concluded with some lively debate, a question and answer session and thank yous from the management to all those who helped organise and attended the event. There was so much interest in the grazing management work by a number of farmers that a further viewing will be organised in a couple of months time when grass growth is more apparent, better able to be measured, and grazing effects are seen.



I'll be back: military boss bids Falklands farewell

AS Air Commodore Gordon Moulds CBE completes his final week as the Commander British Forces South Atlantic Islands (CBFSAI) he said he was going to miss the job, the Falklands and the people. When he was the Chief of Staff

When he was the Chief of Staff and Air Commander in the Falklands in 2004, Air Cdre Moulds was the first to obtain an extension to his year-long tour, an option he would like to have excrcised in his present role. However, he said, CBFSA1 was one of the most sought after command tours in the British Forces and his successor. Commodore Phillip Thicknesse was "chomping at the bit to begin his tour."

When Air Cdre Moulds arrived in June 2008 his first ceremonial role was the 26th anniversary of the Liberation of the Falklands. His final one was the Battle Day parade on Tuesday.

In 1982 Air Cdre Moulds was serving his first operational tour at Royal Air Force Kinloss and participated in a number of operations in support of the Falklands campaign.

His career has included many fast jet hours and in 1988 he became an air defence fast jet instructor and was posted to the Phantom Operational Conversion Unit. He later converted onto the Tornado F3 fighter aircraft and became the Executive Officer of the Operational Training Unit. The recent arrival of the

The recent arrival of the Eurofighter Typhoon in the Falklands is a source of satisfaction for Air Cdre Moulds: "For me it is the right aircraft coming in at the right time as the Tornado F3s go out of service. It will provide, as locals put it, "the Sound of Freedom" over these Islands for many years to come," he said. The outgoing CBFSAI would

The outgoing CBFSAI would not comment on the political relationship between Argentina and the Falklands but said there was no doubt about the British

Government's commitment to the Falklands, as could be seen by the fairly recent arrival of HMS Clyde and the Typhoon, and the ongoing significant infrastructure investment into Mount Pleasant.

He said considering the UK was facing a difficult credit crunch, it demonstrated a huge commitment to the Islands which, in his opinion, would continue.

Another highlight for the CBFSAI was the recent visits from the Argentine families of the fallen: "I hope people realise just how important that was for the Islands to do."

The people who made the visit could not afford the LAN flight, he said: "They weren't interested in politics and it's important to keep the politics out. It was a very successful visit and one that I was proud to be associated with.

"For me it is very much honouring and respecting the military to military relationship and there is no place for politics." The opening of Liberty Lodge in February this year was a privilege, and a facility he intends to use when he returns.

"I have yet to use the facility because I believe it should be for veterans who have retired, as opposed to the serving military," said Air Cdre Moulds.

Discovering efficiencies achievable through civil-military partnership was a target Air Cdre Moulds set for himself when he arrived last year.

The road to the military training area at Onion Range is a good example of that, he said. It was originally planned that the \pounds I million project would be carried out by the Royal Engineers, but is now contracted to the Falkland Islands Government.

The 25-30,000 tonne of stone needed for the Mount Pleasant runway renovation was going to be shipped from the UK, but, he said: "We managed to step in and get the stone sourced locally." Another major project which is looking very promising is a wind farm at Mount Pleasant which has approval from the MoD.

"We're now waiting for FlG to do their work so we can sign a deal for the future service. Things look bright," he said.

"I'm confident that my successor will continue the projects we have started and there are a few other developments we can do with the FIG in the longer term."

Air Cdre Moulds said his only disappointment as his tour drew to a close was that since July he had been kept far too busy by the UK and he had not travelled around the Islands as much as he had hoped over the past few months.

The Falklands has made an impression on Gordon Moulds, and his wife Belinda, and he talks of when he returns, not if.

"I've had the privilege of flying around in a helicopter and meeting the people of the Islands. It's fantastic. The wildlife is second to none and I've become a keen photographer now because of it.

"The locals make the Falklands, along with the community spirit. I'm afraid I will be coming back."

Personally, he said, he had concerns with oil and how it might ruin the Falklands community he loves: "That's my only concern for the future down here, not any perceived threat from across the water."

Air Cdre Moulds' successor, Commodore Thicknesse, joined the Royal Navy in 1978 and served on board HMS Fearless during the Falklands War, and was second in command of the Argentine prize Yehuin.

Promoted to Captain in 2003, he has spent the past year as Director of the Maritime Warfare Centre.

He is due to arrive in the Falklands later this month.

Owner Dr Alastair Baylis, from Australia, was issued with the plates by CPO Paul Elliott, Inspector Len MeGill and Licensing Clerk Celia Short, marking the registration of the 6994th vehicle in the Islands since the start of the present system.

Fishery offers more flexibility

THE steady decline in demand for licences to fish for illex squid in Falklands waters has resulted in Executive Council approving changes to fee levels and payment schedules.

Director of Natural Resources, John Barton, said the paper put before ExCo was intended to introduce some flexibility into the illex fishery and in relation to the fees in particular.

A clear refund policy is to be set out based on catch achieved (less than 1500 metric tonnes per vessel).

Authority for implementing the policy will be delegated to the Director of Natural Resources in consultation with the Director of Corporate Resources.

Mr Barton said it had been apparent for some time that the number of customers interested in illex licences has been reducing, for a number of reasons.

"Additionally, existing customers have been having increasing difficulty in paying the full fee, which is of the order of $\pounds100,000$, and in guaranteeing that the payment will be made," he said.

The poor 2009 season was likely to have exacerbated financial problems besetting the industry and reduced confidence, said Mr Barton.

Licence numbers had over previous years reduced to between 40 and 50, and in 2009 the number of customers who might have taken up licences, had the illex arrived, might have been fewer than that.

"It is unlikely that we will return to the days of over 100 illex licences," said Mr Barton.

"But it is hoped that these changes will maintain and improve interest in licences."

The industry was consulted on the way forward and the changes addressed many of their concerns, he said.

"Hopefully, we will have the illex to make it a good season."

Road death inquest opens

THE inquest into the death of Brian Middleton was opened and adjourned on Monday.

Her Majesty's Coroner, John Trevaskis said the date for the reopening of the inquest would be announced in due course: "At this stage the precise cause of death has not been established pending a post mortem examination," he said. Coroner's Officer, Sergeant

Coroner's Officer, Sergeant David Roberts, said a member of the public contacted police shortly after midday on Friday and said an articulated lorry had rolled on the track between Goose Green and North Arm, just before the culvert area, and there was a person inside.

Residents of Goose Green recovered the body and attempted resuscitation, but they were unsuccessful. Flt Lt Minshall, the Unit Medical Officer at MPA, confirmed the death shortly before 2pm.

Sgt Roberts asked anyone with any information who had seen Mr Middleton prior to the incident to contact him at the Police Station on 28100. He asked anyone who does come forward to not contact the family, to allow them time to mourn in private.

Rig breaks its tow line

THE Ocean Guardian oil and gas exploration rig was diverted to Falmouth on Tuesday after its tow line broke within days of its journey from Scotland to the South Atlantic.

The semi-submersible rig, contracted by Desire Petroleum, left Cromarty Firth on November 26

Andrew Bell, a former general manager of Curnow Shipping, now living in Cornwall, said the tug Maersk Traveller used what must have been a back-up tow line to take the rig into Falmouth while a new wire was sourced.

He said that at 45 tonnes the line was heavier than Falmouth had a crane for, so the Maersk Travel-ler went to Plymouth on Tuesday night to get a new line loaded at Devonport.

The tow was expected to resume yesterday, taking 63 days at approximately six knots. A call into Recife for a crew change is also scheduled.

Tragedy of tea party politics

PN'S recent editorial comment about the new councillors' first public meeting was interesting.

But, as Tony Curran said, the adjective "demure" was appropriate and the atmosphere betitted a tea party.

It was, of course, very much a public meeting of old, with a table of councillors expounding on parochial issues; gentle rhetoric untempered by the reality of government. My bet is that most people turned out to see the new – in some cases returned – political performers at work. If such worthy meetings continue, one can be sure that attendance will fall off. It always does.

To a reader like me, the meeting was interesting primarily because of what it was not. It was not in any way a modern means of communicating and stimulating informed and intelligent debate. It was not online.

I would love to receive an email telling me to stop whingeing because so-and-so has a blog, while that councillor has a political Facebook site and the honourable member from the Jason Islands not only has a blog but also runs a site conducting permanent opinion polls and encouraging petitions. But I am not holding my breath.

I cannot argue that interactive websites, twitter, Youtube, the blogosphere and Facebook suit everyone but, neither do public meetings in draughty halls. The current councillors came to power simply because the old lot did not see the importance of communication.

The incumbents should learn from their mistakes and take full advantage of what is, quite simply, a communicatons revolution.

In due course, online "interface" with the electorate will, along with a vibrant press and lively judiciary, be recognised as a fundamental pillar of democracy. Now is the time to accept this.

I found myself disagreeing with the editorial's view that the "sidelining" of the former council-



lor Mike Summers was unfortunate. That was a little hurtful to the new council and to the people who brought them to power. The voters obviously believe their chosen ones are the right people for the job.

However, I was interested to see that Mr Summers was at the meeting and, to quote the editorial: "Concern for the future path of his successors was apparent."

What we have here is, I think, the nucleus of an opposition.

It can't be official, because we do not have a party political system which puts one party in control. However, it would be excellent if former councillors and others who wish to be active in local politics were to form themselves, perhaps around Mr Summers, into an articulate and helpful opposition.

This could be an unofficial check-and-balance mechanism, examining policy independently, conducting online communications (they too can learn) and stimulating debate.

Remembering Fred Gooch

FRED Gooch, who died recently in the United States, was a longterm Falklands resident whom 1 knew well. Although I had not seen Penguin News, November 11, 2009

him in years, news of his death reminded me how much I had missed him.

I have rarely met a man who had such adventures, and had the ability to grip one with tales of those adventures.

I came to know Fred 25 years or more ago, when he occasionally worked with our family business.

Once, Fred told me how his ship had been torpedoed during the Second World War. Fred was travelling to the UK from the River Plate when the U-boat struck.

It was a somewhat misty and calm day. The entire crew survived the blast and managed to make it into their lifeboat. As they settled in for a long pull to Africa, they heard the distinctive sound of diesel engines coming towards them.

Out of the mist loomed the Uboat. It came to a standstill metres away. A hatch was flung open, and from it emerged the rakish figure of the sub's commander.

He greeted the British mariners politely and asked Captain Smith to make himself known. So good was their intelligence he knew who was in command of the ship.

For perfectly good reasons, Captain Smith was reluctant to identify himself. A lively discussion ensued about which of the survivors had least to lose by joining the Germans as their prisoner. Eventually the real skipper was persuaded to stand up.


The German commander simply wanted to apologise for sinking the ship pointing out, rather needlessly, that as it was war, such things happened.

He went on to check that the lifeboat had an adequate supply of water, that the crew knew their position in the South Atlantic and that they had a compass.

Satisfied that Fred and his friends had a sporting chance of survival, the U-boat slipped beneath the surface and was gone.

Fred survived and went on to have many more colourful adventures. In due course, they became the colourful stories for which we fondly remember him.

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Private sector to reap benefits in first oil rush

THE Falklands private sector is set to benefit financially from the next oil drilling round scheduled to begin early in February.

Though Director of Oil and Minerals Phyl Rendell, advised caution.

She said the planned six well drilling programme "will only last around six to eight months," and there would then be a lull after the initial flurry of activity.

During the anticipated rush, Falklands hoteliers, engineering trades, heavy goods drivers, telecommunications organisations and businesses offering services at FIPASS (Stanley's port) were likely to enjoy additional income, Mrs Rendell said.

Four AIM listed companies have raised additional funds of approximately £250 million in the last two months, demonstrating the commitment and confidence investors have in offshore exploration.

Sientists believe the Falklands could have as much as 60 billion barrels of oil underneath its coastal waters. But Mrs Rendell said that if this were discovered to be a

Summers takes on new role

AFTER 16 years as chairman of the Falkland Islands Overseas Games Association (FIOGA) and the previous two years as vicechairman, Patrick Watts confirmed his decision not to seek re-election at the annual meeting of FIOGA on Thursday.

Mike Summers, a former member of the Executive and Legislative Councils of the Falkland Islands, was elected to replace Mr Watts.

Mr Summers said he was delighted to take up the role of chairman.

"I look forward to encouraging and assisting sports clubs and individuals to make the best of opportunities available to them to participate in international sporting events," he said.

He paid personal tribute to the work Mr Watts has done to promote sports in the Falklands, and to promote the Falklands overseas through sports.

Mr Summers' appointment is for four years, taking FIOGA through the Commonwealth Games in Delhi 2010, the Island Games in the Isle of Wight in 2011, the Commonwealth Youth Games in the Isle of Man in 2011, and the final event of this term will be the Island Games in Bermuda in 2013.

reality, exploitation would not be for at least ten years.

If oil was discovered in commercial quantities, the Falkland Islands Government would charge nine per cent royalty on production and 26 per cent corporation tax on profits less than £1,000,000.

Mrs Rendell said if enough money was made in the long term the Falkland Islands Government had expressed a wish to pay the British Government for its defence.

Currently this is the only area in which the Falkland Islands does not support itself financially.

She emphasised that in the event of oil exploitation in commercial quantities, production would take place offshore so there would be minimum impact on the infrastructure of the Falkland Islands.

In the meantime Mrs Rendell believed the most likely outcome of the next drilling round would be "increased knowledge of the presence of hydrocarbons," although she hoped for more than this.

The Oil and Minerals Department is currently busy ensuring necessary approvals are in place to ensure safe drilling.

Desire and its partners Rockhopper Exploration will share the oil rig Ocean Guardian during the drilling programme to the North of the Falklands.

The number of wells drilled may be extended depending on the success of the programme.

Exemption extended for MPA contractors

MOUNT Pleasant based defence contractors have been granted a further year of being exempt from paying tax in the Falklands, pending the completion of the Tax Policy Review.

In a paper put before Executive Council last week, the Commissioner of Taxation said that on completion of the review further recommendations would be made.

However, in the meantime, the existing exemption would remain in place until December 31, 2010.

Prior to 2007 local people employed by defence contractors also had the benefit of being exempt from tax. However, additional criteria was added to the

FIH cashes in on profit

FALKLAND Islands Holdings has made a £3.1m profit after selling three million shares in Falkland Oil and Gas.

FIH offloaded 20 per cent of its stake in Falkland Oil, representing 2.1 per cent of the issued share capital of FOGL.

The group still owns 12 million shares, or 8.2 per cent of the business.

Falkland Oil shares have doubled this year as it prepares to start drilling in the East Falklands Basin during the first half of 2010. exemption regarding the whereabouts of employees at the time of recruitment.

The review has been ongoing. In a paper submitted to Executive Council in December 2005, it was estimated that the annual revenue that could be collected from defence contractor employees amounted to between £750,000 and £900,000.

The Commissioner of Taxation said information gathered at that time showed the majority of employees were and would still remain under the personal allowance, and that it was therefore unlikely the estimate would have increased significantly.

FIH has told FOGL there are no plans to sell any more shares, other than in "exceptional" circumstances, before completion of the drilling of the Toroa well.

"We have today reduced the risk profile of our group," said chairman David Hudd. "The proceeds of sale give us the flexibility to take advantage of investment opportunities particularly in the Falklands and will leave us with a modest level of gearing. At the same time we have retained a very meaningful shareholding in FOGL."

More political family history

I REFER to your article in the November 20 edition of Penguin News, and must write that you haven't got the complete or correct version yet.

Mrs Vinson, wife of Dick Vinson (the manager of North Arm Farm for many years when it was still owned by the FIC), was indeed the first woman to be elected to LegCo, and represented the East Falklands constituency until 1969. The eight member line up then was three elected for each of Stanley and the Camp, with two appointed by the Governor.

Mrs Vinson was not returned at the next election, but my sister Nanette (Ning) King was elected to a Stanley seat and, at this same election. I was elected to a Camp seat. When we voted among ourselves to appoint two members to ExCo, Dick Goss and I were elected and served for the life of that council.

The first major political event later that year was the visit of Lord Chalfont who was to try to persuade us that our long-term future would be best served by the acceptance of Argentine sovereignty. Knowing that we would be put under considerable pressure, our splendid Governor, Sir Cosmo Haskard, proposed that ExCo and LegCo be combined for the period of the visit and this was done.

It worked so well that on completion of the Chalfont business, it was unanimously agreed that we would continue in the combined state for the remaining three years. So technically, I guess that makes my sister Ning the first woman to be appointed to ExCo, but in a trial of combined councils which was not continued after the 1972 election.

Some "firsts" with siblings in the government were made during that eventful period. I have no quarrel with the final paragraph of your earlier article on this subject. **Robin Pitaluga** Salvador

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Falklands veteran sells medals for a record £70,000 at auction

MEDALS belonging to a Falklands war veteran who wanted the cash because his injuries prevented him working, have fetched a record £70,000 at auction.

Captain Ian Bailey of Ash Vale, Surrey, was awarded the Military Medal for his part in an attack on two Argentine positions on Mount Longdon, in 1982.

He said he had been unable to work for several months because of the injuries he sustained in that

battle. The auctioneers confirmed the price fetched had been a record.

Capt Bailey, a 22-year-old corporal in the Parachute Regiment at the time, was shot three times in the battle that killed 23 British soldiers.

One bullet went through the back of his neck, breaking the cord of his identity tags. He was also the last man to see Victoria Cross

recipient Sgt Ian McKay alive. The pair had been attacking the enemy position with grenades.

The X-ray images of Capt Bailey's shrapnel injuries and his identity tags, which were found during a de-mining operation a year later, were included in the lot. Auctioneers Dix Noonan Webb said the lot was bought by a private collector in the UK who wanted to remain anonymous.

"It's a record price for a Military Medal."

said director Pierce Noonan. "The reason it sold for so much is because of the significance of him being involved with the last action of Ian McKay."

He added that it was an emotional day for Capt Bailey: "He was sad to see his medals go but he was happy with the amount of money that they raised." he said. Capt Bailey had managed to secure a new job, which he started on Monday, but said before the sale he still needed the money from selling his medals.

"It's probably the second hardest thing I've ever done," he said.

"The first hardest was telling my soldiers to fix bayonets at the bottom of Mount Longdon.

"These medals mean a hell of a lot to me." The sale was prompted by a spell of unemployment due to ill health linked to his war injuries.

When Capt Bailey said he contacted the veterans' minister through his MP about his financial predicament. he said he was advised to contact a charity for help.

The Ministry of Defence said Capt Bailey received a tax-free pension.

November shivers to a record

NOVEMBER was the coldest and wettest since records began in 1986. Days of snow, sleet and harl all surpassed previous records. and while it was less windy, there were fewer hours of sunshine. Temperature

The mean maximum temperature was 9.5C, well below the longterm average of 12.7C. The highest temperature recorded was 16.7C on the 25th. The lowest maximum was 4.3C on the 12th. The mean minimum temperature was 1.5C, compared to an average

of 3.9C. The lowest minimum was -4.5C on the 13th and the highest minimum was 7.5C on the 27th. Rainfall


Total rainfall 94.1mm, against an average of 41.1mm. The wettest day was the 4th with 19.2mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 27 days and 1mm or more fell on 18 days. exceeding all previous records Sunshine

Sunshine totalled 189.9 hours, well below the monthly average of 215.3 hours. The highest daily total was 13.7 hours on the 26th. Snow

There were 15 days when sleet or snow fell, the highest on record. compared with the average of five. Snow was lying on four days, again a record. There were a record 15 days when hail fell, well above the average of six days, and there were two days of fog.

Wind/Gales

The monthly mean wind speed was 15.5 knots, against the average of 16.2 knots. The highest hourly mean speed of 34 knots occurred on the 20th and 28th. The highest recorded gust was 50 knots on the 1st. There were 20 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots, which is above the average of 18 for the month. Four gale days were recorded, slightly below average for the month.



THE controversial matter of expenditure of public money on Stanley Dairy is to be referred to the government's Public Accounts Committee

The decision was made at a recent meeting of Executive Coun-

Councillor Jan Cheek said it was agreed that the Public Accounts Committee Ordinance should commence on February 1. or as soon as possible thereafter.

The Attorney General, David Pickup, in a paper considered by the Executive Council, said that if it was desired to conduct a review of the Stanley Dairy saga, it would be possible via a number of mechanisms. He said these could range from conducting an internal review to a full inquiry.

Mr Pickup recommended that a reference be made to the PAC. once it was established, along the following lines: "To consider and report to the Governor on the expenditure of public money by FIG/FIDC in support of the Stanley Dairy, the lessons to be learned from the failure of the Dairy and how future such projects should be managed to prevent a recurrence.

The PAC would then look at it in terms of economy, effectiveness and efficiency of the benefit (or otherwise) derived from the expenditure of that public money, he said.

Weston fights for better deal

FALKLANDS veteran Simon Weston has launched a new venture to help raise thousands for military charities.

Forcesdeal.com, an insurance comparison website, promises to donate 70 per cent of its net profits to a wide range of military charities, from the British Legion to the Army Benevolent Fund.

The former Welsh Guardsman. who became a public figure after he was disfigured during an attack on the Sir Galahad, was medically discharged from the Army in 1984.

He said: "They kept me for two years, so I could leave with six years under my belt, which is better for the pension. That was good of them.

"But as for the help I got, well, it was mostly my regiment. They were brilliant. But I didn't get much from the Army officially.

"Why do soldiers get so much less in pay, benefits and compensation than police officers or firefighters? It's not fair.'

Do not adjust your set: TV service will resume shortly

Andrew Lee, Director of Procurement and Efficiency, presents a specially written article on efforts to restore and upgrade television in the Falklands...

WITH a recent edition of the Penguin News saying the government's TV plans had ground to a halt, as the senior civil servant working on the TV project I thought I should report on the latest status.

Since my arrival in the Falklands in September I have, along with other dedicated personnel, been working on the TV project as a top priority.

To a person on the project, we are all very disappointed that viewers in the Camp have had no service and we have all been pushing as hard as possible to recover the situation. Talk of a collapse seems rather harsh.

It is certainly upsetting for the personnel who are working hard to put things right and for the valued partners and contractors whose contributions to the project we could not manage without.

There seems to be lots of blame currently circulating in the air, pointing the finger at this supplier and that supplier. Naturally, affected viewers have every right to be frustrated and angry at the situation.

The fact of the matter, however, is that the current service is affected due to the dilapidated state of transmission equipment on Mount Maria.

Services Sound and Vision Corporation (SSVC), owners of BFBS. have been warning for several years of this possibility. Unfortunately, weathering and lightning strike has contributed to bringing the aged infrastructure to its knees.

Ironically, this has all happened at the same time that the government has been choosing which way to go in moving TV from a one channel, terrestrial service into the world of digital transmission, bringing a better quality of picture, a wider choice of channels and new associated digital services to everyone.

What does the future hold?

IN August, after considering a number of technical and commercial project options, the decision was taken by Executive Council to award the digital TV project to SSVC.

Since this time the investment in the new infrastructure for Stanley viewers has been made. New capital broadcasting equipment will be hosted on Sapper Hill.

This equipment is currently being made to order and is scheduled to arrive in early April 2010. Once installed, which will take a few

weeks. Stanley viewers will be able to receive the new digital service. Channels will be BFBS 1 and 2, a children's channel, the exact channel to be confirmed, and most likely the Sky News channel again this to be confirmed once legal broadcasting rights have been finalised The BFBS channels

will provide a variety of programme choices, and Andrew Lee all broadcasts will be time

slipped to scheduled local viewing times. Sky News, if secured, will be

All Camp viewers who have ordered a new 1.8 meter antenna from the Government Secretariat will have their antenna, decoder (set-top box) and viewing card available to them between March and May next year.

On installation of the SSVC system they will be able to receive TVservices for the above channels straight away. The Camp installation will be carried out by the local contractor G&S Electrical.

The installation schedule will start at properties in and around Port Stephens on the West, gradually moving to properties in the north and on outlying islands.

G&S will be using two two-person crews working in parallel to make as much progress as possible. Once completed on the West and islands, efforts will transfer to the East, starting in the south and moving north to properties towards Elephant Beach and Port Harriet before arriving back to Stanley.

The overall plan for installation requires effective coordination and collaboration between SSVC, the US antenna supplier, the UK cable suppliers, G&S Electrical as well as support from Workboat Services Ltd and possibly FIGAS.

The TV project team is playing a key role in making all of the logistics and interdependencies work.

As with the Sapper Hill equipment for Stanley, the antennas for Camp are also being made to order.

Two weeks ago, we did have delays reported by the US antenna manufacturer: we had hoped to have all 140 antenna systems arriving here in March. However, we are now having to take the delivery in two parts: 50 complete systems and 90 part systems (dishes only) followed

by bit parts in May. This does not interfere with the installation plans on the West and we will continue to apply pressure to improve the production time, shipping schedules and any other time factor we can, including adding more installation crews if this is practical

and affordable. As of today, 50 complete antenna



West will commence as soon the 50 systems required to complete all customers on the West can be ferried to Port

Installation on the

Howard, driven down to Fox Bay for storage and on to Port Stephens

to commence installation. Overall installation time on the West will be around four weeks. If people in the West have not already made their concrete plinths, they are encouraged to do this as soon as possible. It would be ideal that the plinths have time to cure and settle before the antenna is mounted.

The parts to complete the further 90 systems will be arriving in May so that installations on the East and islands can be carried out.

Overall installation time on the East will take around six weeks and 3-4 weeks for the islands depending on access.

It may be that a start can be made in erecting the antennas on the islands and East Falklands prior to arrival of the remaining parts with the sites then revisited to install the parts once they arrive in May, the feasibility of this will need to be assessed nearer the time.

What do we get for our money?

AS a result of the significant investment being made by the Government into broadcasting infrastructure, the overall investment is just short of £750,000, all of the Falkland Islands will be receiving a modern digital TV broadcasting service of its favourite British programmes.

For every channel the Government, with the collaboration of its partner SSVC, will have secured the essential broadcasting rights with the BBC. ITV and others to ensure the legitimate viewing of all broadcast programmes.

We will be getting the benefit of a professional support and maintenance scheme that will ensure that dilapidation problems don't reoccur in the future and will have an infrastructure, owned by the Falkland Islands, that gives a good platform for the future should other channel options be desirable and affordable.

In addition, Radio services will be enhanced as part of the overall investment. FIRS will be made available on satellite once the new Sapper Hill facilities are in place, removing the dependency on Mt Maria.

The current FM coverage from Sapper will be significantly increased and an FM service of BFBS Radio 2 added for Stanley. Options for providing a permanent free to air 24/7 feed of BBC World Service are being investigated by SSVC along with replacing the current FM FIRS service in Camp.

Firm technical plans for this are due shortly and will require authorisation by the Executive Council

I am very pleased to report that the project for both digital TV and Radio is running to budget and when delivered should be public money well spent for the services available.

What viewers will have to pay inthe way of a media or viewing charge, if anything, for the four channel BFBS service, will be a matter of future Government policy.

Policy requires ExCo approval

AS no policy has yet been set on a media or viewing charge or as to when one will be payable, it is not appropriate for me to comment on this. Policy will require approval of the Executive Council as will the approval of any additional expenditure over and above that currently approved and spent to deliver the above detailed plans.

Dates to follow early next year

I AM very grateful to the Penguin News for the opportunity to print this article and wish to express my thanks to all of the colleagues, partners, contractors on this project for all of their efforts to date and to their continued professionalism and willingness to make the project a success for the Falkland Islands.

In particular thanks go to, Stuart Holmes, Mark Edgar and Nick Pollard of SSVC and Darren Shepherd of G&S Electrical.

Everyone involved sincerely hopes the next BFBS 1 recovery attempt works in the interim and that viewers will enjoy the new four channel digital service when it starts arriving from early next year.

The project team will be publishing early in the new year, the specific dates on the timings of antenna installations at individual property addresses, and may be requesting accommodation for the installation crew members as they visit your area.



Housing to be high on the agenda

A REVIEW of the government's housing strategy is among issues to be discussed by Legislative Assembly members next month.

Spokesperson Jan Cheek said housing was a "huge" issue: "There are sites available. The problem is, of course, that the price of land has rocketed, and for many people who have difficulty getting a mortgage anyway, it is putting even a very modest house out of their reach.

"We have to find some way through that. A lot of people liked the East Stanley model where subsidised sites were offered, which enabled people to build and, although government of course had the expense of subsidising the sites, they had no other expense because the houses were privately owned and maintained thereafter. So that's just one area we'll be looking at.

Transport, roads, FIGAS flights and means testing will also be high on the agenda.

John St cafe approved despite lack of parking

THIS month's meeting of the Planning and Building Committee saw. for the first time in several months, a full attendance of all members.

It was also the first to be chaired by newly-elected Councillor Sharon Halford, who was joined by Cllr Jan Cheek. One member of the public attended. The committee reviewed 12 applications for planning permission.

The first of these was a submission by Byron Holdings Limited to extend and modify the existing building at Byron House, 3 H Jones Road. This was deferred at the last meeting to enable the Environmental Planning Officer. Antony Payne, to discuss additional parking provision with the applicant. Members resolved to grant consent conditional on the provision of four extra parking spaces prior to occupation.

Two applications sought planning permission in principle: these outline applications were for the erection of a bungalow on land to the rear of 1 and 2 Racecourse Road, submitted by Zaza and Natasha Elbakidze, and for a dwelling on land to the rear of 88 Davis Street (fronting Callaghan Road) by David and Carol Thorsen. Both submissions received the consent applied for subject to conditions.

The following applications for detailed planning permission were granted conditional consent: an extension to their dwelling at 18 Murray Heights for Reg and Margaret Anderson: the erection of a polytunnel (required due to its size and proposed siting) at 9 James Street for Andy Watson; a dwelling at Mullet Creek Farm. East Falkland for Claudio Ross: the provision of a hardstanding and installation of a standby power generator at their premises on Lookout Industrial Estate for FIG's Computer Section: erection of a single-storey dwelling with attached garage at 15 Sulivan Street for Allan Steen and Kerry McRae: and two applications by Byron Holdings Limited on land at 33 Coastel Road for the erection of a warehouse and two silo plants.

Also approved, by majority vote, after some debate over the absence of car parking provision on the site, was Susan Knipe's proposal to change the use of premises at 23 John Street from retail to that of a café, with seating for twelve persons and including the provision of toilet facilities. The last use of the premises was that of a shop but the building did have use as a café by the previous owners.

One other application on the list - a proposed porch extension at 17 James Street for Brian and Diana Aldridge - was deemed to be "permitted development" and therefore did not require the consent of the committee.

Building Adviser Nick Stephens introduced his current list of 47 applications for building permits, explaining the procedure followed where there had not been a satisfactory response within the statutory time limit to requests for further information, and which had thus led to the rejection of some of the applications. He pointed out that when the extra details were submitted satisfactorily then issue of the building permit could then take place.

The next meeting of the committee is now scheduled to take place on Thursday January 7 at 8.30am in the Liberation Room. **Graham France**

Air Italia flies in to prop up Falklands airbridge

THE collapse of airbridge operator Flyglobespan sent shock waves through Mount Pleasant (MPA) on Wednesday, but the MoD insists services between the Falklands and the UK will not be affected.

News broke on Skynews that the carrier – which won a contract last year to operate twice-weekly flights to MPA from RAF Brize Norton in Oxfordshire-- had gone into liquidation.

Announcements were broadcast to military and civilian staff at MPA, but a MoD spokesperson said at present flights were continuing as normal.

"The failure of Flyglobespan will not affect the movement of RAF personnel to the Falklands and Ascension Island," the spokesperson said.

"The MoD lets contracts through a central broker who has already employed Air Italia to replace the Flyglobespan flights."

The Edinburgh-based arfine is Scotland's biggest, and last year carried more than 1.5 million passengers on 12,000 flights.

The majority of its 800 staff have been made redundant and 4,000 passengers were reported to be stranded overseas.

It has been carrying up to 184 civilian and military passengers, departing Brize Norton on Wednesdays and Sundays, and leaving MPA on Fridays and Tuesdays.

As the company's flights were grounded, there were initial fears Islanders and military personnel might not be able to travel to and from the UK over Christmas.

Cabin crews also were reported to be stranded in the Falklands and on Ascension Island, where the flights refuelled.

Flyglobespan is a sub-contractor to the MoD's main contractor that operates the airbridge.

The MoD spokesperson told the Penguin News: "We have been

in contact with contract brokers in the UK and we have been assured measures are in place to continue the airbridge as normal."

The British Forces Command Secretary contacted the government on Wednesday, with an assurance flights would continue.

Andrew Lee, Director of Procurement and Efficiency, said: "The main contractor is committed to operating the airbridge and will be making suitable alternative arrangements, as necessary.

"It is presently reported that there is no disruption to the service.

vice. "The flight leaving the UK this evening [Wednesday] and the flight departing to the UK this Friday are not affected. In the event that difficulties do arise, the MoD's main contractor will enact contingency plans to find other suitable aircraft.

"FIG is being kept up to the minute with news, and as soon as any news up-date materialises this will be made known to the Falkland Islands public."

In October 2008 Flyglobespan was awarded a MoD contract to operate the airbridge using a Boeing 767.

The two-year contract with two one-year options was expected to run until 2012.

It was described at the time as the "most economical advantageous solution" to the MoD's passenger, aero-medical and freight requirements.

Mr Lee said: "At present, anyone with concerns should keep a look out for further press notices or radio broadcasts."

"FIGO in London is aware of the news and can be contacted, during UK office hours, by any passengers with concerns or experiencing difficulties in the UK."

Air Italia has taken over the Falklands-Brize Norton route "for the next few weeks."

A spokesperson for the MoD said: "Brokers have already employed Air Italia to replace the Flyglobespan flights in the short term. Negotiations are under way to determine a long term solution."

A chance to take a dive with Dave

A NEW Falklands book to hit the shelves this week takes the reader on an underwater adventure as well as containing the first comprehensive list of ship wrecks around the Falklands.

Beneath Falklands Waters by Dave Eynon is packed with pictures and information of a world that is little known to most of us and few of us would have the courage to explore.

Dave has been diving in Falklands waters for 30 years and claims it is some of the best cold water diving in the world.

The absence of sharks is a plus and the presence of seals is a bonus, said Dave, who added that for him one of the best parts of diving in the Falklands is exploring the magnificent kelp forests that surround the Falklands.

Dave has been diving since he was 13 years old. When he arrived in the Islands as a travelling teacher in 1970, he was impatient for his gear to catch up with him so he could get back in the water.

Thirty-nine years later with many dives and some great adventures behind him he has completed his book, which is an ongoing project.

project. "It can be added to and resized in the future and I still have enough pictures to do another book," he said.

One of the greatest pleasures for Dave in diving beneath Falklands waters, is to know that he is diving in an area never visited by man before.

However, with the physical size of the Islands, their indented coastline and hundreds of scattered small Islands, there will be much left for the next generation of undersea explorers to record their finds, when his diving days are over, he said. But there is plenty of diving left in him yet and he

intends to continue his exploration, filming, photography and recording, for as long as he stays fit and healthy.

Dave has been instrumental in setting up the Wreck Survey Group and the Marine Exploration and Research Centre and has taught and encouraged other local divers to explore Falklands waters.

He has produced two underwater videos for the BBC and continually strives to improve his portfolio of photographs above and below the waters of the Falklands.

In the foreword of Beneath Falklands Waters film producer Nigel Marven pays tribute to Dave's knowledge of the marine and dive sites.

He said: "This book is an indispensable guide to dive sites and the creatures, large and small, that you can encounter there."

Beneath Falklands Waters is on sale at the Boathouse, Capstan, Pink Shop, the Museum and the POD, at £19.95.

On Tuesday Akademik Sergey Vavilov (110 passengers) calls in to Carcass Island and West Point. The Lyubov Orlova, which also has 110 passengers, visits Saunders Island and West Point on the same day. The Bremen, with 164 passengers, makes an early morning visit to Bleaker Island on Tuesday, before she joins the Minerva (441) and Hanseatic (188) in Stanley.

On Wednesday the Fram, (317 passengers) goes to Saunders and New islands, Prince Albert II (132) to West Point and Saunders Island, while Le Diamant with 226 passengers visits New Island and Grave Cove.

The Akademik Sergey Vavilov (110) calls into Stanley along with Lyubov Orlova on Wednesday.

Twelve mines destroyed: almost 20,000 still to go

TWELVE mines have been destroyed since demining operations began at Surf Bay this month.

Demining Programme Manager Robin Swanson said there were Argentine records of the Surf Bay minefield, which was laid by Marine Engineers between April 16-23 1982. Records indicate it contains some booby traps and almost 1,000 landmines: a mixture of Italian manufactured anti-personnel and anti-vehicle mines.

Mr Swanson said: "Given that we believe there are around 20,000 landmines still buried throughout the Falkland Islands, clearing this minefield alone would reduce the threat by five per cent."

The first mine was found five metres inside the fence about 5cm beneath the surface and was firmly held within the root ball of the vegetation. He said it was unlikely to have ever moved

Demining operations began at Sapper Hill on December 11 where Argentine records indicate there are almost 200 Spanish manufactured anti-personnel mines mines.

Eight lanes have been inserted into the minefield on the south side which are designed to locate the mine rows, and so far two mines have been located. Mr Swanson said BACTEC was making excellent progress towards obtaining

full accreditation for the complete spectrum of operations to be carried out during phase one operations this summer.

But he said there were two separate incidents at the end of last week which jeopardised the safety of the operation.

One was a vehicle carrying cruise ship tourists that ignored the road closure signs at the north end of the Surf Bay minefield and travelled into the danger area.

He said fortunately an alert supervisor was able to stop mine clearing operations before the car reached the minefield. The second incident concerned two vehicles speeding along the MPA road past the Sapper Hill site which sent road stones flying against the Command Post on the side of the road.

The DPO and BACTEC thanked the community for their patience while clearance operations continued, adding that the road closures were critical safety precautions to protect the public.

Mr Swanson asked people to respect road closures and reduce speed opposite the Sapper Hill site to 25mph to help protect deminers while they were crossing the road: "Their job is hazardous enough

without imposing additional risks from speeding drivers upon them."

Astiz on trial

THE former Argentine navy captain who signed the surrender of South Georgia to the British Task Force in 1982 has gone on trial in Buenos Aires for his alleged involvement in the disappearance and torture of dissidents during the country's 1976 to 1983 military dictatorship. Alfredo Astiz, known as the "Blond Angel of Death," is among 19 former military officers on trial in Buenos Aires.

Raft Race

THE annual Stanley Raft Race kicks off the New Year with teams competing along a 500yard course from B slip, near the bottom of Snake Hill, to the Narrows Bar. The fundraising race is organised by Stanley Sea Cadets and starts at 12.30pm on January 1. For more details and an entry form, phone Ken Newton on 52779.

New port sites

IN addition to the three potential sites of Port Harriet, Port William and Stanley/FIPASS already under consideration for port development, councillors have said that two further sites in Port William will be considered by Port Project Manager Ken Johnson and stakeholders.

Steer clear

POLICE are warning motorists to steer clear of demining areas after a number of drivers ignored road closure signs. Sergeant Tom Whistler said: "This is not only a hindrance to the operation but a danger to the deminers and the vehicles passing their working area."

Police accident

A POLICE officer was injured on Friday in a single vehicle road traffic accident on the Goose Green to North Arm Road, about six miles from North Arm. The vehicle involved was a police 110 Land Rover. The incident is under investigation.

PAC prompts portfolio changes

STUART Wallace was this week appointed chair of the Public Accounts Committee, which will come into operation on February 1 next year.

Other members will be Mike Forrest and David Lang. Elected members will be Legislative Assembly members Emma Edwards and Sharon Halford.

A statement from Government house said the PAC would have an important scrutiny role over the public accounts of all government departments and specified bodies to ensure public funds had been expended properly for the purposes for which they were voted by the Legislative Assembly: "The PAC may also consider the adequacy of the government's arrangements for the management of financial risk."

Executive Council decided on November 26 that one of the first matters to be referred to the committee should be a review of the expenditure of public money on the Stanley Dairy.

Mr Wallace said: "I am pleased to have been appointed to the Public Accounts Committee and look forward to working with other members in ensuring that it makes an important and constructive contribution to the scrutiny of the effectiveness and efficiency of our public services and of the accounts of bodies which are in receipt of public funds, as set out in the Ordinance."

A number of government portfolios have been reallocated to allow Mrs Halford to sit on the committee, as the Constitution disqualifies the chair and deputy chair of the Standing Finance Committee from becoming a member of the PAC.

Mrs Halford will take on the transport portfolio from Gavin Short, and Mr Short will be deputy portfolio holder for treasury and taxation matters and will assume the deputy chairmanship of Standing Finance Committee in place of Mrs Halford.

We'll act on report or sack us, says Sawle

DICK Sawle says he will be "absolutely astonished" if the latest version of the Doyle report into telecommunications in the Falklands is not acted upon by the Legislative Assembly.

Several versions of the report have been submitted by consultant Dr Chris Doyle, while concern has grown over the adequacy of the Islands' phone and internet services. Cable and Wireless currently has an exclusive licence as the Islands' telecoms supplier. The company has an agreement with government which precludes competition prior to 2019.

Legislative Assembly member Mr Sawle told a public meeting on Tuesday: "If it was not acted on this time then basically I think you should sack the lot of us."

He said the report, with figures blanked out for commercial reasons, would be circulated once it had been read by members. "It should be out in the public domain very soon," he said.

"It's a very important document and I would urge anybody to read it very carefully." MLA Bill Luxton said: "It's

MLA Bill Luxton said: "It's one of the most important things that's facing this assembly.

"Either we stay in stone age communications, as we have been for quite a long time, or we join the rest of the world and try and catch up."

Top stamp issue

Justin steps up to chief executive in telecoms

FALKLAND Islander Justin McPhee has been appointed as acting Chief Executive of the Falkland Islands business unit of telecommunications company Cable and Wireless with immediate effect in the absence of Aaron Richardson.

Mr Richardson leaves the Falklands tomorrow to take on the role of relief Chief Executive of the Cable and Wireless business unit in Diego Garcia, a British Indian Ocean Territory.

Mr McPhee joined Cable and Wireless in 1989 as a trainee technician and has worked in all technical areas of the company.

Camp residents will recall his frequent visits as a technician when the original Camp telephone system and subsequent upgrades were installed along with his great love of chocolate cake for smoko.

Mr McPhee said he was absolutely delighted to be given the opportunity to carry out the role of Acting Chief Executive.

He said he had seen massive changes in telecommunications over the past 20 years, from assisting with the first Camp project which saw the introduction of international direct dial telephone service, through to the deployment of a mobile service and the design and installation of the latest softswitch and broadband networks across the whole Islands.

He said: "I think that this knowledge, my understanding of the business and the challenges of living and working in the Falklands

gives me a great start. I have a good local team to support me in my new role and I look forward to their continued commitment as we work to improve our service to the Islands."

The promotion comes at an interesting time with the bedding in of the new Camp network, the bandwidth upgrade just completed and the installation of a new softswitch which has just started.

This, along with discussions with Government about the Doyle report and plans Mr McPhee had for the business, would, he said, keep him busy: "I look forward to the challenges ahead."

In the New Year his first priority will be to start actively engaging with customers both in Stanley and Camp.

He said all broadband customers would receive a free 20 per cent extra usage allowance during the month of January, details of which would be advertised next week.

Earlier this week Cable and Wireless increased the Island's

bandwidth capacity from 8Mb/s to 12Mb/s on the incoming internet circuit, and from 4Mb/s to 5Mb/s on the outgoing internet circuit.

This additional capacity should improve the broadband experience for customers.

Mr McPhee said it was a complicated upgrade as it involved the replacement of various pieces of equipment to carry the additional capacity.

"When changing these vital pieces of equipment within the network, a few outages were necessary and we would like to thank our customers for their patience," he said.

The long wait

THE cost of returning HMS Endurance to the UK was approximately £4.3 million, however a decision on the ice patrol vessel's future has still not been taken. The Defence Equipment Minister said earlier this month that options for restoring Endurance were still being examined and no final decision on whether to repair or replace her had been taken.

Cruiser rescue

AN elderly Canadian cruise ship passenger from MV Star Princess was airlifted to Stanley Hospital on Tuesday night for medical treatment. The ship was 50 miles north of the Falklands when the military search and rescue team were called to assist the 69-year-old.

Locals call foul on rugby visit

THE behaviour of the visiting Argentine rugby team has been criticised this week following a number of alleged incidents in the vicinity of the Community School.

The group of 35 men leave the Falklands on Saturday.

At the public meeting on Tuesday a number of issues were raised including why the team was permitted on the Government owned football pitch, and allowed to stay in government owned Lookout Lodge accomodation if the present Assembly had withdrawn the passive support of the previous Assembly. Legislative Assembly spokesperson Jan Cheek said at the meeting that legally they could not stop people from playing on the field, or sleeping in a government owned building.

Members of the public said they were unhappy with the men giving gifts to children and filming them: "None of us are comfortable with them lying in wait outside the schools," Cllr Cheek said. "It's fair to say political capital will always be made out of this sort of visit."

Councillor Glenn Ross said the visit had changed considerably from what was previously planned and two of the previous councillors had expressed their concern at how much it had grown.

The councillors at the meeting repeatedly said they did not want to talk about it in depth: "I don't want to talk any further and feed the propaganda machine," Cllr Cheek said.

An Argentine newspaper reported that one of the players, Omar Turcuman had said the visit was really an excuse to "break the ice a little in the political field. They want to use rugby so that those differences are merely political and not human."

A spokesman for the rugby team told Penguin News: "If at any moment our actions were uncomfortable for you we want to apologise, it wasn't our intention. "The aim of this organisation is to develop rugby as a formative sport, if you consider it convenient for your community. The experience of playing rugby here will be fixed in our hearts."

Councillor Cheek told the Penguin News that following discussions with the Attorney General's Chamber and the police the rugby team's times for hiring the football pitch had been changed to later in the day so that they were not around when the children came out of school.

She said some of the rugby players might be genuine sportsmen, but it was guaranteed that the Argentine press and the government would make use of the visit for propaganda purposes.

While members of the public had expressed concern at recent visits and drawn parallels to the 1970s, Cllr Cheek said she would like to reassure people that the present position was very different to what it was in the 1970s.

Jhelum wood recycled into a replica of the Stanley hulk

A MODEL of the Jhelum made from a section of the wreck's bow wood has been created and the sculptor is looking to sell his work.

Islander Maurice Blackley spent almost three months carving the model from a piece of wood he retrieved when the bow of the wreck, which had rested at the West end of Stanley Harbour, finally collapsed after a storm last year

The Jhelum was built in Liverpool in 1849 and arrived in Stanley in August 1870, leaking and in distress. She was condemned and sold to Dean & Co for use as a storage hulk

Mr Blackley worked from images and information he obtained from the Museum here and from the vessel's home port of Merseyside

He said that unfortunately there was no pictorial record at all of the ship under sail, so the sail structure is his own interpretation of how it would have looked in its glory days.

The model is housed in a glass case, the frame of which is also

PREPARATIONS for the arrival of the oil rig Ocean Guardian are underway, with Byron McKay Port Services employees getting up to date with the health and safety legislation required to work within the oil industry.

John Brolly, a man with 15 years experience in the oil industry and the health and

safety trainer with North Sea Lifting (NSL), based in Aberdeen, has been in the Falklands for the past two weeks.



Depending on the category of equipment used, reassessments will take place every five years.

Mr Brolly, who has recently spent time in Azerbaijan, Georgia with British Petroleum (BP) said he was surprised to hear that it was not expected by Mineral Resources to be extracting oil commercially in the Falklands for ten vears

He said it was his personal opinion that "depending on how things settle" when the Ocean Guardian oil rig arrives in the Falklands, oil could be extracted commercially within two years.

Sheffield's captain dies aged 69

REAR-Admiral Sam Salt, who died on December 3 aged 69, commanded the first British warship to be sunk by enemy action after the Second World War.

During the Falklands War, Sam Salt was captain of the Type 42 guided-missile destroyer Sheffield, one of three ships stationed upthreat of the task force to protect the aircraft carriers Hermes and Invincible.

The ship was hit by Exocet missiles launched by Argentine Super Etendards. The Exocet were detected by the intercept equipment, but at low level and short range, and her Seadart missile was unable to engage.

Despite every effort to save her, by early evening Captain Salt had to order his crew to abandon ship, with 20 dead and 24 injured.

Though emotional in the days immediately after the loss of his ship and some of his people, afterwards Sam Salt managed to keep his grief private and to retain the loyalty of the survivors in the HMS Sheffield Association.

James Frederick Thomas George Salt, always known as Sam, was born on April 19 1940, six months before his father was lost in the submarine Triad, which sailed from Malta for war patrol in the Gulf of Taranto, and was never heard from again.

The Navy's confidence in Salt was demonstrated by his appointment, immediately after the Falklands War, to command another Type 42 destroyer, HMS Southampton. In 1984 he became Assistant Chief of Staff (Operations) at fleet headquarters in Northwood, where he managed naval operations worldwide. including deployment to the Persian Gulf and the Falklands, evacuation of British nationals from Lebanon, the clearance of mines in the Red Sea in 1985, and surveillance operations against the Soviet Navy at the height of the Cold War.

Rear Admiral Salt was quiet and economical with his words but, despite his small stature, was renowned for his enthusiastic leadership, his ability to motivate people, his astute decision making and, not least, his sense of humor.

No interest in running FIG


IT was unclear in last week's paper what your editorial was trying to say given the short section of my Chamber Christmas speech quoted, but it is clear to me we have large gaps between the strategies that FIG is pushing and the actions that are sometimes taken by their officers.

The high recruitment costs paid by FIG are a matter of public record.

You missed for whatever reason the first part of that section of my speech which set the context for what I was saying: "We are working with FIG to bring in clear reporting guidelines, based on best practice from other ports that will help in the case of viruses on visiting cruise vessels. This should avoid confusion and minimise future loss of business that was encountered with the NCL vessel."

FIG has a policy of trying to encourage the cruise vessel industry, on which many people's jobs depend, and it also contributes a large amount of direct income to FIG that, if it had to be replaced by direct taxation or spending cuts, would severely damage the economy and hit every person's standard of living.

Having seen the reaction by cruise operators in a couple of recent cases to what appeared to be badly informed and poorly com-



municated decisions we sought to bring some kind of protocol together, and understanding of the likely effect of individuals actions, so everyone knew where they stood. That is why I made my reference to joined up thinking.

In the case of cruise vessels and infectious diseases we looked at what would be the normal procedure elsewhere. I assume most would agree that Gibraltar, as a close-knit community and in a warmer climate than here, would have a reasonable policy on such matters.

I copy below a reply I received on this from the Chief Executive and Captain of the Port, Gibraltar Port Authority:

"We treat this as any other infectious disease, as follows. We advise the GHA infectious disease department (Dr Vijay Kumar and the Port Medical Officer) before the vessel arrives to port.

The officer goes on board before anyone else does and makes sure that the affected people and those that have come into contact with them or have shown signs of the virus are kept in isolation. Once clear and the duty officer is

satisfied we then proceed to allow the passengers to come ashore.

The new policy adopted by FIG since that meeting reflects the statement above and has enabled them to obtain the information required, and I quote a section from the new agreed protocol from FIG:

'On the basis of this information it should be possible to make a balanced judgement regarding the risks posed and the safety of disembarking passengers and jointly discuss how to achieve safe disembarkation if at all possible.

By making early contact it will be possible for the Port Health authorities to contact the Communicable Diseases Consultant (based in the UK) and/or the Health Protection Agency in the UK for specialist advice if needed."

The Chamber I hope has always spoken in a straight forward manner and whilst my name may be there as President, as also outlined in my speech, we go to great lengths so that the Chamber does not become a personal or political platform.

We have no interest in running the government. However, we question the actions of FIG when required (just as any other person or organisation can) and we believe in a democratic society this helps ensure FIG's actions stand up to scrutiny.

When the realities of World War war hit home with a vengeance

SEVENTY years ago the Battle of the River Plate took place and HMS Exeter limped back to Stanley where Islanders cared for the dying and wounded crewmen. John Allan was just seven years old, and it made a huge impression on him. He has since researched the event locally and abroad and has prepared a booklet for publication.

FOR a couple of years prior to the outbreak of World War II. the Admiralty's major defence strategy for the Falklands was to station a small squadron of cruisers in the Islands.

HMS Excter and Ajax were the first to arrive with Achilles and Cumberland joining later. Islander John Allan recalls that Exeter and Ajax were a familiar sight in and around the Falklands.

"We thought of them as our own ships as their crews were well known and befriended by everyone, moreso by Stanley folk as the ship's crew spent a lot of time ashore," he said.

On board Exeter were two local crew members, steward Bernie Bernisen and stoker Owen Gleadell, and Stanley school children were keen to attend parties held on the war ships.

Just three hours after war was declared, the Ajax captured and sank the first merchant ship in World War II, the Olinda, bound for Germany with cargo from Montevideo.

Both Exeter and Ajax were in Stanley at the beginning of December 1939 with Ajax leaving very early on December 2 and Exeter on December 9, to escort the SS Lafonia to Montevideo. On board were Falkland Islands volunteers on their way to Britain to join the armed forces.

The Achilles had arranged to rendezvous from the Rio de Janeiro area and the three warships were to meet at a prearranged position on December 12 in order to seek out and destroy the German

pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee.

They were not alone in their task: a total of 21 British warships, including three aircraft carriers, had also been deployed to seek out the Graf Spee, which had sunk nine British merchant ships in the previous three months.

As dawn broke on December 13, the Graf Spee was sighted by Commodore Harwood's squadron. He had time on his side plus the advantage of speed and numbers, but he faced a potentially much more powerful enemy

He divided his force and sent Exeter into attack from one bearing while Ajax and Achilles threatened from another. By 7.30am Exeter was so badly damaged she had to withdraw from the battle and head back to the Falklands.

With Ajax and Achilles still to contend with, Captain Langsdorff on board the Graf Spee opted to head for the safety of the neutral port of Montevideo and obtained a 72-hour extension of the permissible 24-hour stay to repair damage and bury the dead.

Captain Harwood, reinforced by the Cumberland, sat outside the harbour and with the British propaganda machine working overtime in Montevideo, Captain Langsdorff believed a lurther two ships had joined Capt Harwood.

Mr Allan said if Capt Langsdorff had had a full comple-

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ment of experienced officers and crew "there was no doubt he would have risked action to try and fight his way out to sea again." an opinion he formed after speaking to the German ex-crew members who remained and settled in Montevideo.

However, Hitler could not bear to suffer the ignominy of having one of his pocket battleships sunk and ordered Capt Langsdorff to scuttle the Graf Spee. On December 17, 1939 the Graf Spee lay at the bottom of the River Plate.

The Exeter, severely damaged and leaking, arrived in Stanley on December 16, 1939.

"The realities of war came to my generation with a vengeance," said Mr Allan. "The pungent smell of burning, antiseptic and burnt cordite drifted across the harbour and the dying and wounded were brought ashore for attention."

Sixtyfour of the original crew of 600 were either killed in action or later died in the KEM Hospital. Damage to Exeter was so extensive that most of the crew was billeted ashore. Two stayed at Mr Allan's family home.

They were people the townfolk had known personally for some time: "It was a stark reminder of the price of freedom," said Mr Allan.

There was no ambulance in those days so the PWD forries were made as confortable as possible to transport the wounded to hospital, which could normally accommodate 17 patients. Beds were set up on whatever floor space was available and the staff rose to the occasion.

The Navy and civilians worked together to repair Exeter and by January 18, 1940 she was able to proceed under her own power back to England where she received a triumphant welcome.

The ship's cat, a ginger Manx tom named Exeter by the local kids, and thought by some to have had his tail shot off in the battle, spent the rest of his life with the Pettersson family at the Rose Hotel in Stanley.

CAMP Education pupils have braved the elements and held their summer camp at Fox Bay West on West Falkland.


Although the weather was pretty challenging, all the pupils managed to sleep in their tents each night and all kept warm and dry.



A unique bird, a unique island and a real appreciation of home

OVERCAST and verging on cold, particularly for this time of year, a certain amount of excitement built up regardless as we donned our lifejackets and boarded the Sea Quest on Saturday.

We were taking the last trip of the day to visit Kidney Island, to experience some wildlife and a little haven of unspoilt Falklands scenery, in parlicular to meet and appreciate the Cobb's Wren.

For a landlubber like myself a trip on any pe of floating vehicle always inspires a smile. Secretly, I've always fancied myself as a Swallows and Amazons type person, who just never learned how to sail, so bouncing across the waves always seems the height of good fun.

Heading out of Port William and around the Point, however, spoilt this illusion slightly, with the bouncing taking on a slightly more aggressive nature, and a slight feeling of nausea almost over-

shadowing my determination to enjoy. All was forgiven upon arrival on Kidney, which truly is a little piece of unspoilt beauty. The tussac is that high you could easily get lost, and with no concrete paths evident (thank God the makers of concrete paths haven't quite made it to Kidney yet) the paths through truly resembled a maze, with the occasional pit of mud, or low slung, trip level foliage to make the experience more exciting. As this was the last trip of the day we had

missed the earlier good weather, so to keep warm we walked across the island to see the rockhopper penguins and their fearless ascent up the cliff face. The wind was that strong and cold, talking

was difficult, but the view was breathtaking, and the experience unique.

After taking many a picture of a windswept penguin, we once again struck out through the tussac expecting to stand on an elephant seal at any moment, before arriving on a completely calm and sheltered beach. I sat close to sea lions, and watched them have a scuffle, and forgot completely I was actually quite cold, and in need of caffeine and a cigarette.

The true purpose of our visit, other than to view an unmodified, ungrazed Island, with no introduced predators, and to take the opportunity to see what the Falklands is really like, in the words of Cobb's Wren Conservation Programme operation manager Sally Poncet, was to spot the the small brown bird, with a big bill and a big attitude. The Cobb's Wren, named after Arthur Cobb, a farmer and ornithologist who sent a preserved skin of one of the birds to the British Natural History museum, is unique to the Falklands.

Only about 13cm long it's tiny, but unafraid of humans, as it goes about its business completely unfazed by my gawping, camera armed presence. This bird was declared a separate species way back in 1909 from a sample collected on Carcass Island, and has lived in the Falklands ever since. But not so happily, as it turns out. The Cobb's Wren likes tussac and, as about


80 per cent has been lost over the past two centuries due to uncontrolled grazing and fires, it's not doing too well

Not found on mainland East and West Falklands at all, the Cobb's Wren mostly sticks to outer islands, more than half of which are less than 50ha in size. Mostly importantly, perhaps, it simply can't survive if there are rats or mice around, or any other introduced predator.

Sally said it was really important to keep the rat eradication and invasive species programmes going, as the worry was that people already trained would lose their expertise if there was too big a gap with no funding. If anyone is interested in volunteering their help, contact Sally on 21826 or Nick Rendell on 27390.

Heading back to the Sea Quest, and an eagerly anticipated cup of tea as soon as I got back to Stanley, I'm reminded of what it is to live in the Falklands, a place with so much natural unspoilt beauty. It is a bit of a responsibility for all who live here. In a world of cement and plastic, let's keep the Cobb's Wren and our majestic scenery, and tussac bogs and lack of trees.

The next trip to Kidney Island is planned for March next year.



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



O WHAT "rolling contracts," contracts that are not normally advertised, do FIG have with what companies and for what services?

What is the value of each contract?

Is consideration given to advertising the contracts each time such contracts expire? If not what reasons might preclude this happening?

A The following response was provided by Simon Wilkie, Financial Services Manager at the Falkland Islands Goverment Treasury.

FIG will normally obtain competitive tenders or quotations for its contracts, following procedures outlined in the Financial Instructions (including advertising for tenders)

Factors which might lead to contracts not being advertised include absence of any effective competition (or a low likelihood of competing bids proven by previous experience) and highly urgent work. Satisfaction with level of service and value for money might also be considered.

There have also been cases where the bids received on re-tendering a contract were higher than the existing rates and better value has been obtained by negotiating a new rate under the old contract.


All departments have been circulated for their responses on "rolling contracts" and advertising and their replies compiled to provide the following summary.

Fisheries have several items that might be regarded as rolling contracts, although consideration is usually given to advertising or tendering for the services.

These comprise: out of hours radio watch-keeping (C&W); harbour patrol launches (FIC & Sulivan Shipping Services); vessel monitoring service (Bluefinger Ltd); scientific fisheries advice (Imperial College) and fish ageing (Sea Fisheries Institute, Gdynia). These have a combined annual value of around £126,000.

PWD do not have any rolling contracts or contracts that are not normally advertised, unless the Partnering Agreement is considered as such and that does not have a specific annual value but depends upon the work done each year.

There are some services such as office cleaning now done by contractors. For PWD cleaning is under a fixed-term one-year contract and was advertised, but some departments have ongoing cleaning arrangements.



There are some works (generally building maintenance works) where PWD periodically advertise for expressions of interest then ask those on the register of those who have expressed interest to bid rather than advertising each individual job, but these again are not rolling contracts.

Consultancy work is often and probably usually let by means of selective tender, primarily because it is usually apparent that there are no local organisations to provide the service needed. This is provided for in the Financial Instructions.

FIG also make use of ad hoc specialist advice from the British Geological Survey, the Health and Safety Executive, and tax, legal and actuarial specialists. These services are normally sourced as necessary and are not rolling contracts, or for specific values.

There are some cases where ongoing specialised services are provided. Although these are likely to have been advertised or tendered originally, they are not readvertised at regular intervals-

These are rpi measurement (Synergy), specialist support and licensing for the financial system (Touchstone) and management of FIG investments (Newton and HSBC investment managers).

WHY are pedestrian crossing road markings allowed to become so worn and faded that they are difficult to see until you are almost upon them?

 ${f A}$. This answer was provided by Roads Engineer of the Public Services Department, Bob Hancox.

It has been agreed that the pedestrian crossings on John Street and Villiers Street are to be relocated so these ones will not be repainted.







THE Penguin News has grown to become an institution in the Falklands, ever since founding editor Graham Bound first put typewriter key to ribbon back in those pioneering newspaper days of 1979.

Other newspapers had existed up until then but, as Graham argued in his first editorial, the Islands lacked what he called a "true newspaper." Graham introduced readers to

Plato the Penguin, who has since morphed into the pocket-sized king penguin on today's masthead, and the 16-page first edition carried one small advert: "Wanted to buy: one long arm stapling machine. Should be suitable for stapling copies of the Penguin News. Apply to the Editor."

He almost apologised for the lack of readers' letters, which was entirely understandable, of course. As was this report from an ExCo meeting: "Other fiscal matters were discussed but as the Penguin News was not then in existence we failed to record any details."

But the staple diet of any local newspaper – community news – was there from the start.

And one of today's media personalities made her first appearance in print in that debut edition, when Corina Goss took first prize in the Stanley Social Club children's fancy dress competition for infants three years and under.

A good newspaper reflects the interests of its readers, and attempts to inform, entertain and inspire debate.

That the Penguin News has survived for so long is testament not only to the tenacity of those who steered it through its fledgling years but, just as much, to the community to whom it belongs.

My first six months in the chair have been among the most fascinating of my

career, and I look forward to many more. When I was selected from a pool of 50 applicants eager to move to the Falklands. I anticipated I would be joining a small and enthusiastic team. They are, in fact, among the most dedicated workmates I have had the pleasure of knowing, and they have become valued friends as well as colleagues. While I hore a though thought

While I hope I have brought with me some of the newspaper

expertise the Penguin News was seeking from overseas, Fran, Sharon and Ailie have taught me much about the people of these Islands, past and present.

Among them, of course, are my predecessors, each of whom played a critical role in developing the newspaper and, on occasions, fighting for its survival. As too have all the staff who have figured on the Penguin News honour roll over the years.

It is no coincidence that while the newspaper has often struggled on minimal resources and with few people manning the decks, it has earned a deserved reputation for punching above its weight.

In today's 30th anniversary supplement, the six other surviving editors look back on the days when they were representing the Fourth Estate, and some of the trials and tribulations they faced along the way. usually working long hours, as people with ink in their veins inevitably do.

It wasn't – and still isn't – a simple or easy task to produce each edition. But I know of no one associated with our newspaper teams, past or present, who does not wear their Penguin News badge with pride.

As editor of the best little newspaper in the world, it is indeed a rare privilege to carry the torch into our fifth decade of publication.

A flight of fancy for a plucky little penguin

I CANNOT recall why I decided to give the first mimeographed and stapled collection of folded foolscap sheets such a whimiscal title.

Certainly, there were times when I slightly resented that perky bird's tone as it emerged from the Roneo 750. I could not help feeling that a paper which intended to raise and debate serious issues deserved a monicker with greater gravitas.

Thinking about it now, though, I recall they were difficult times. Subconsciously, perhaps, I may have felt that if the Islands were to have a new paper it did not need one that took itself too seriously. If the name and the frantically flapping bird on the masthead put a smile on readers' faces, then it might take their minds off the issues that made them frown or even weep. Times were bad, you know. We had a

Times were bad, you know. We had a dangerous political situation that would lead to invasion just three years later, an economy that relied increasingly on the sale of postage stamps, a declining population (fewer than 1,900 people) and a pervasive feeling that no one loved us.

In any case, the name stuck. Penguin News, often iconoclastic, journalistically highly unprofessional and more than a bit pugnacious, wriggled its way into the affections of the Falklands.

It even became something of an institutional symbol, rather like the Upland Goose Hotel.

A paper of any other name might have disappeared during one of its troubled and financially stretched periods. But people seemed to accept the Penguin was only hibernating. Like gentoos and magellanics, it always came back.

Never mind the origin of species. What were we trying to do? Other news media existed in the Falklands. We had – and

enjoyed – the Falkland Islands Times, edited by the redoubtable Dave Colville. And there was the government-run radio station, FIBS (another terrifically inappropriate name, sadly gone).

But the former had become not much more than a comic – if a very funny one – and the radio station, while doing a fine job in many ways under the management of Patrick Watts, was a government

asset, and as such could not be expected to be too irreverent about the establishment or the British Government.

Our rusty but trusty Roneo

THERE was a place a for a new paper; one that would, as well as reporting, try to do some analysis and introduce some intelligent criticism.

Those were pretty lofty ambitions, but the reality is we were amateurs.

Those early issues were poor. Bad syntax, inaccurate reporting, nearly libellous and sometimes unkind. It might have been better if we had reached the final chapter of the yellow and orange copy of "Teach Yourself Newspaper Publishing" that sat on a shelf near the rusty but trusty Roneo.

But we did manage to show that ordinary Islanders, who had just had their rights of British citizenship taken away, were not "supine," as one visiting junior FCO minister described us.

He probably thought we would not even have the wit to look the word up.

We covered issues that some would rather were not discussed and received disdainful treatment from Government House and the Secretariat in response.

When, for example, we repeatedly asked Government House why it was that locally employed civil servants could not be trusted to carry the diplomatic bag to the British Embassy in Buenos Aires, we were told to "stop sticking our neck out."

The observation that the appallingly potholed roads could have contributed to the death of a young motorcyclist resulted in a curt note from the Attorney General, who had overseen the inquest telling us that we were in "contempt" of his court, and there should be no further comments of that kind.

We did not stop and were threatened again. They were empty threats.

Little Chay

LITTLE Chay, probably the best columnist ever to pen words for the Penguin News, lightened the mix, addressing with his fauxinnocence such essential issues as the unfairness of colonialism.

"Uncle Wrecks" was the unfortunate addressee of Little Chey's letters. I hope he laughed at them sometimes. Our readers certainly did.

Principal among the people who helped the Penguin News back then was my father who, throughout his time as a civil servant, had struggled to suppress a rebellious streak.

He mutated from dutiful Assistant Colonial Secretary into Little Chay. He also proof read the pages before they went on to the Roneo's sticky black drum.

Rosemary King, would turn-to on the typewriter when I turned up at midnight on the day before publication waving another foolscap sheet of copy.

Duncan Davidson, who long ago left the Islands, was our first (and, I think, last) cartoonist and he gave a pugnacious face to Little Chay. Then there were many friends, most of whom are still in Stanley, whom I would sometimes invite to a collating party.

We walked in circles around the office for hours bringing the pages together, and ending each cycle with the triumphant thumping of the stapling machine.

On the "other side" I remember Dick Baker, the Chief Executive, to whom I would

go almost weekly seeking material for the news pages.

Dick and I would idle away an hour or two in his office armchairs drinking tea.

He seemed to appreciate the company and would usually tell me far more than he should, bookending our chats with a phrases like: "Of course, you probably shouldn't write that down in the Penguin News."

I wouldn't, because I appreciated being treated as an equal and being trusted by a representative of the government which normally considered us second class citizens.

In early 1982, our little world was beginning to fall to pieces.

Our more-or-less monthly issues were asking questions about the patrol ship HMS Endurance, which was bound for the scrap yard or for the Chilean Navy after one final cruise.

Plans to build the Royal Marines a new barracks had been cancelled by MoD, meaning the Marines would stay in the ruins of the old radio station at the Head of the Bay until the Argentines kindly blasted the place to bits.

Tightening the noose

THE Argentines had reduced their flights from two a week with an F28 jet and a plodding old F27 prop plane to just one a week with the F27.


The prices of flights had gone up as well, and the fuel, which was being supplied by the Argentines under an FCO-awarded monopoly, was either increasing in price or being rationed.

There were Argentine reconnaissance over-flights and touchdowns. Everything combined to create a ligature that would eventually strangle us, unless our attitude to Argentina changed.

It might seem odd, but at that time, the Penguin News was not as critical of the Argentines as it was of the British Government.

We knew to expect hostility from Buenos Aires.

The British Government, however, was supposed to be friendly. And when friends let you down, it is easy to develop a particularly bitter kind of anger.

We asked difficult questions of Government House, or of visiting ministers. Platitudinous, pompous and patronising, the Foreign Office ministers would refuse to answer reasonable questions.

Speaking at a so-called press conference at Government House, Baroness somebodyor-other was questioned by Patrick Watts and me about what would happen if the Argentines got nasty.

"I cannot answer hypothetical questions," the haughty lady repeated, as Patrick and I, both deeply irritated, continued to ask them.

As the almost absurd situation on South Georgia developed during the last weeks of March 1982, the Penguin News struggled to keep up with it.

The antics of a lot of scrap metal merchants observed by beardy scientists of the British Antarctic Survey did, however, seem to be dangerous, and we kept a diary of the unfolding events, headlining it "crisis."

For a change, the editorial in the late March issue was aimed directly at Buenos Aires: "It is time," we wrote, "for HMS Endurance to show us what she is capable of, and to arrest the Argentines and throw them off South Georgia."

That, we suggested, would put them back in their box very effectively.

The headline that never was


WE went to press about two days before the invasion, still peddling the South Georgia crisis and why it was time to give the Argentines a good smacking.

We missed what would have been the most screaming headline of the Penguin News' short history: "Invasion!" When the dust had settled and what I call

When the dust had settled and what I call our "phoney war" commenced, I took stock and tried to figure out how a local newspaper might function under occupation.

It could, of course, have been produced perfectly well by siding with the Argentines.

They repeatedly informed us that they wanted life to continue as normal. But that would mean either being the military government's poodle and publishing their propaganda, or producing something so anodyne that we would still look back on it

with shame. Publishing a newspaper that was critical of the authorities, which were now the Argentine military government, was not a choice at all.

As people left town, assuming (wrongly, in some cases) that Camp would be safer than Stanley, distribution would become increasingly difficult. And producing it in secret would have been impossible.

Stanley was not the kind of place in which one could hide. And anyway, they knew who I was.

Along with hundreds of other people, I had been arrested and interrogated during the early days of the occupation.

Producing a file clearly marked with my name, they looked through it and asked why I had been taking photos on the day of the invasion (which was true).

I said that these were for eventual use in the newspaper. I was told I would be watched. I was suitably spooked, then released.

Still not sure what to do, I approached the senior Argentines, who had occupied the Secretariat, and said that I wanted to interview the high command, and could they arrange it.

"Yes, certainly," they said. "We want the society to continue as normal, and you will be welcome to print your interview."

They would call me the next day to give me time and place. There was no call, and so I returned to the Secretariat. This time I was told that as Britain was "planning aggression" the time was not right to resume publication, and I should not do so.

This was, in a sense, a relief. Being effectively banned meant the decision had been made for us. It would, in due course, be better to look back on a period when the Penguin News was closed down by order of the new authorities, than look back on a publication that might have lost its bite.

The challenge then was just to keep on taking pictures and notes, so that when the time arrived we would be able tell the story.

The first post-war issue of the Penguin News, with the rather famous "Victory, Freedom and a Future" cover, did not appear

Joe King was to print the special red, white and blue cover, and I was to conduct many interviews. But in the wreckage of Stanley nothing was happening fast. In due course, though, it felt great to get the historic issue out.

It is often said that everything changed on June 14 1982. It is true. From that moment we knew that we could never again be treated as colonial hangers-on.

The war was fought ostensibly for our freedom, but that was not entirely true. It was at least as much about the British Government's survival. But this inconvenient truth would become even clearer if London continued to treat us as second class citizens.

So in came real self-government, a complete review of the economy and $\pounds 31$ million in aid to set up new enterprises. Out went the hated law that denied us the right to live in the UK.

The Islands were changing radically, and they were changing fast. The Penguin News also needed a better press, and I flew to the UK to seek some support.

The Guardian published a piece about my search for expertise and some printing equipment, and two people came forward.

One was Rob McBride, a young man who wanted to be a journalist. He would come to Stanley and help to revitalise the paper. Rob did a terrific job and we worked beautifully as a team.

The other – and you are not going to want to believe this – was Robert Maxwell.

Meeting Mr Maxwell

MAXWELL'S people had read the piece in the Guardian. Out of the blue came a phone call inviting me to meet the publisher.

I was ushered into his office at the top of Maxwell House in London. At that stage Mr Maxwell had not acquired the Daily Mirror and was not well known outside the worlds of politics and publishing. He had certainly not yet misappropriated the Mirror's pension fund and fallen off his super-yacht.

The huge bulk looked up from his desk and said: "I understand you want some help

with your newspaper. Tell me what you have in mind."

I gabbled my reply and, at the end of ten minutes, he looked me square in the face, and said: "I am prepared to help you, but there is a condition. The paper must never support the Argentines. They had their chance and they f.... it up."

I gave Mr Maxwell the assurance he needed, and he went on to say that because I had been so persuasive he had decided that he would not simply give or loan us the money, but he would own it with me.

We would, he said, set up a company, and his publishing staff would be posted to Stanley to help run the paper. He would have 49 per cent of the shares, and I would have 51 per cent.

"I'll get my people onto it straight away," said Mr Maxwell. "We'll meet again to sign the documents. Meanwhile, this is a secret. It's between you and me. If it gets out, that'll be the end of it."

I said I would also get my best people onto it. I did not have to look far. That was a Friday. On the Sunday I woke up to the phone ringing. It was one of his people. "The Sunday Times," he said. "Some-

"The Sunday Times," he said. "Somebody's given them the story. He's furious and he's backed out."

No wonder. The columnist (a man who is now a successful thriller writer, and whom I have never quite forgiven), made huge fun of Mr Maxwell "buying" a pational newspaper.


Mr Maxwell "buying" a national newspaper. The only problem, said the poisonous scribbler, was that it was the Penguin News, with a readership of less than 2,000.

Despite my protestations of innocence, I never heard another word from Mr Maxwell. The deal was dead. Perhaps we had a narrow escape.

But what we did not have was new printing equipment, so it was back to our trusty Roneo, this time with Rob McBride to help.

He was paid £70 a week and I kept whatever was left after we had paid for paper, ink, custard creams, tea bags and rent of the Union office on Ross Road. Rob sometimes earned more than me.

It struck me that this transition period was remarkable for the pace of rebuilding, rehabilitation and political change.

There was never a dull day. It was a journalist's dream.

We accompanied John Nott as the Defence Secretary toured the garrison, and we grilled junior FCO minister Cranley Onslow and parliamentarians, who were now visiting the Falklands with a very different tune to that which they had whistled pre-1982: "What a staunch and loyal people we were; how admirable and worthy of British money."

Sir John Biggs Davidson MP told us that the Falklands could be a new bastion for a South Atlantic Treaty organisation in the struggle against the Russians and the Warsaw Pact.

It was pointed out that Moscow's navy was venturing ever further onto the high seas and, when Panama was nuked, Cape Horn would become a vital passage. "Of course it is up to you," said Mr Biggs Davidson.

is up to you," said Mr Biggs Davidson. The first CSE variety show, a rather racy affair that the stodgy old MoD would not authorise today, arrived. Never before had the Town Hall stage hosted girls with so little on.

"It ain't 'arf cold, mum," read our headline, with obvious reference to the display of goose pimples.

A gentleman from Everards Brewery turned up with plans to produce ale in the Falklands, mainly for consumption by the troops. At about the same time, banker Archie Mitchell arrived to consider the potential for a local branch of Standard Chartered.

Suddenly we were feeling a lot better about ourselves, and about Britain. It seemed we were no longer the embarrassing relation who didn't know when it was time go home.

Letters in the Penguin News reflected the optimism among Islanders, but also slight bemusement. Something else came to me from the yellowing pages of those old editions. Ordinary Falkland Islanders had a very tough time.

I think that now, 30 years after the Penguin News was launched, and some 27 years after the war, it is OK to admit that we suffered. The fighting itself was bad enough; some accounts of Islanders' wartime experiences that we published could curl one's hair.

Post-1982, the problems were more prosaic but still real. Malcolm Ashworth's dairy herd had been decimated by the occupiers, and there was an inadequate supply of milk. The quality of meat from the butcher was poor and getting poorer. Fruit had never been common, but now it was non-existent.

The Air Service had lost all its planes, so Islanders had to request lifts on military helicopters or navigate across Camp where the threat of mines had not yet been assessed. That did not scare someone, though. An Agricultural Department Land Rover had been seen in the middle of a suspicious area, and the bomb disposal team believed it had been booby-trapped. Weeks later, they returned for a second look, but it had gone.

The Penguin News reported with, I admit, some glee, that the police believed the Rover had been removed by local people, and either sprayed a new colour and its number changed, or stripped down for parts. The mystery remains until this day.

But there was still a risk that the fighting might not be over for good. "Are the people of Stanley vulnerable to air attack?" we asked in one edition.

The Argentines had not conceded defeat, and a British garrison of some 5.000 underlined the risk they still posed.

We told readers the air raid warning would be the steady sounding of the town sirens. This fear eventually faded, to be replaced with the cold war that continues to this day.

Whatever we have now is a result of the determination and the ambition that were born in the few years that I have just described.

Much also happened during the quarter century that brought us to this 30th anniversary. There were tragedies and there were triumphs and, apart from a few periods when the noise of the clanking Roneo ceased temporarily, the Penguin News was there to report and record them.

The paper has done a good job with its first draft of history. It is an achievement of which editors and readers can be proud.

A struggle to survive in antiquated times

PEOPLE always asked me when I was preparing to go there and, ever since, why I went to the Falklands. The answer is a mix of curiosity and desperation.

I had had a bad couple of years in London, dealing with a series of tragedies, and was desperate for an escape.

As I was having little luck in London developing my career as a journalist. I resolved to find a newspaper job somewhere, anywhere, abroad.

Then I received a letter from Graham Bound which, compared to the cautious responses offered by other publications, sounded more like a cry for help. He would be delighted if I could work on the Penguin News.

In fact, he wondered, could I run it because he was far too busy helping his mother in her shop and he felt strongly that it was an important time for the Islands to have a regular paper.

Looking back, it was exactly the break away I needed, trying to run a newspaper for a community I knew nothing about and having a lot to learn in a short period.

I expected the Falkland Islanders to dismiss me as an impertinent outsider but, despite a pair of old women muttering that I must be an Argentinian spy with that surname of mine, most people proved tolerant and supportive.

I have particularly strong memories of my first home there, renting a room from Malcolm and Susan Binnie whose quiet kindness, humour and dignity I still regard as the best of the Falkland spirit.

Despite my determination, producing the Penguin News single-handed often proved a struggle; a struggle to survive on the measly takings but, more particularly, a struggle to produce every edition on the antiquated Roneo duplicator which more often than not required manual cranking of every page and a

special skill with elastic bands and string to hold it all together.

On one occasion. I had laboured for the whole day to lay out the front page of an edition only to find, on returning from a tea break, that my cat Gizmo, coming in from the garden, had walked across the master copy - leaving a neat, clear set of paw prints right across the headlines. It was, literally, back to the drawing board and the cat was sacked from his duties as an editorial assistant.

Another vivid memory is the day a telex arrived from the United Nations, asking for 1,000 copies of the latest edition to be rushed to New York so members could study the latest news ahead of a UN debate on the Islands. Due to another crisis of string and rubber bands. I was able to send only ten copies.

I found it could be a lonely job, having no one with whom to discuss editorial decisions. Nor to share the sometimes acute pressure when, as on a few occasions, I published controversial editorials and articles.

Overall, however, I enjoyed my time in the Falkland Islands, and when I left I was relieved and encouraged by the fact that, at last, FIDC had agreed to invest in some modern printing equipment without which the paper had no future.

I'm delighted but not at all surprised to hear that Penguin News is thriving. I'm sure it continues to provide a vital forum for debate and sharing information which is particularly important in a small community, to counter the distortions of rumour and hearsay.

I feel honoured to have been part of the exclusive Penguin News club and wish it all the best for the future.

Shock and awe and an incredible adventure

IT seems like a lifetime ago since I was editor of Penguin News. I cannot believe it was so long ago when I headed south to Stanley on what was to be an incredible adventure.

In truth I suppose I should admit I was ill-prepared to be an editor of a publication which, particularly at that time, punched above its weight. It still does, and it amazes me so many people around the world know of the Penguin News and have seen a copy at some stage.

It was an exciting time for the Islands with so much change, development and upheaval, but I can truly say that it was one of the most exciting times in my life which I enjoyed immensely, and which gave me a few life lessons along the way.

To fellow Scots I describe the Islands at that time as Shetland without the red tape. The emphasis was to make things happen and not to allow overbearing bureaucracy get in the way of good ideas.

However, with that approach comes an element of risk, and that was never better displayed than with the collapse of Seamount, which was the parent company of Penguin News Limited.

Having been an investigative reporter for seven years before this I continued to work on the basis of rattling cages and seeing what fell out of the bottom.

But really this post required a little more subtlety and maturity than I was probably able to bring at that stage of my own personal and career development.

I take comfort in the fact that many people I have spoken to since have said that at least the shock value of some of my stories and methods did make many realise that they were expected to be accountable, and that there was a paper which would not just be an information sheet for government, but also a forum for healthy debate and

venting of any frustrations from Islanders and interested onlookers.

There is an endless list of people who made things possible during my stay, and I can't thank all of them enough. I just hope that I managed to establish something that was a little brash, did not allow institutions" to rest on their laurels, made Islanders feel they had somewhere to put their arguments or voice opinions, and which was worth a read.

I look back to that time now and cringe a little at the naivety of the content and the lack of shape or polish to the presentation.

I have kept an eye on developments in the Falklands, even occasionally putting pen to paper when I see some twit pontificating on the Islands when they have absolutely no understanding of the people, the place, or the circumstances. The Falklands are a very special place with a fine people who are well capable of running their own affairs.

It was my privilege to spend time among them and to attempt to produce a paper which maybe represented some of their views and items they wished to see aired.

It has been immensely pleasing to see the paper continue with all the improvements in presentation and standard over the years.

It is frightening to see pictures of folk now who were just small children when I was there, and it just proves that time marches on. I still look forward to one day coming back.

Thoughts of the Islands and the Islanders still leave me with a warm glow. I have always said that if I had not had to return to the UK I would probably never have left or else have spent a much longer time there. To all I knew there, a heartfelt "Hi Chay!" and thank you for all the outstanding memories and experiences I have from my time there.

A princess returns to

WHEN I became editor, the Penguin News was located in the building which now houses the Visitor Centre.

In those days it was a dark, unlovely and malodorous place, whether from bad drains, dead rats or simply darkroom chemicals, nobody was ever certain.

Apart from the Penguin News, the ground floor held the local office of the British Antarctic Survey and the upstairs contained part of the Government's archives and the whole of the

Customs and Excise Department. There was, I think, just one common toilet, furnished usually with technical magazines about maritime matters, should anyone have forgotten the "bring your own" rule with regard to toilet paper.

If the immediate surrounding lacked charm, the office itself was not much better; precarious piles of paper perched on every available surface, interspersed with bits of stale food and old cups of coffee. Two large facing desks occupied the centre ground, dominated by a towering printer.

By the only window was an inclined light table, littered with paper strips, glue dispensers and craft knives, where each page was laboriously cut and pasted.

Much of the furniture bore traces of heavy previous use and indeed some of the chairs had come from the dump.

My job interview with the Media Trust was a strange one. The first part was dominated by the retiring editor, the late Jim Stevens, a man with previous newspaper experience in the UK, which might even have included a spell in Fleet Street.

He was quickly able to demonstrate that my own Fleet Street experience, consisting of one night shift serving tea and sandwiches in the canteen of the News of the World's warehouse, had left me poorly equipped for the business of producing a newspaper, even when coupled with a spell as editor of a university newspaper. Apart from agreeing that the paper needed an editorial voice, the

local content. Perhaps to illustrate this point Laurie Butler cut short one of Jim's repeated attempts to demonstrate my technical incompetence by launching into a long, but very amusing yarn, concerning Neil Watson and an octopus.

Media Trust seemed to want more

When later Jim asked me what I would do if I found myself short of half a page of content with the

deadline approaching, my response that I would simply ring up Laurie and ask him to repeat the story for publication brought forth laughter and almost applause.

Of course, in a sense Jim was right, as I was to discover on actually occupying his chair. Left to myself I could not have produced the paper.

Fortunately the then Assistant Editor, Leona Roberts, did know what she was doing and, though rightly disappointed at not getting the job herself, she put up with my presence long enough for me at last to feel on top of the situation.

Apart from the reintroduction of the editorial, I would like to think that the Penguin News did become more locally focussed during my editorship.

The debates in the letters page were often about things which might have seemed trivial to outsiders, but were obviously important to local people. Two of the fiercest concerned whether horses should be allowed back on Cape Pembroke after the conflict or whether dogs should be allowed on Surf Bay. Even my dog contributed to that one.

At one time of staff shortages, when it looked as if I might have to bring out the paper on my own. I took on John Leonard as my assistant. For those who never met him, John was an American who had come to the Falklands in the fifties as a missionary for the Baha'i faith, working first as a travelling teacher and then in the FIC offices. He had been long retired when I offered him the job and he asked: "Are you sure you are allowed to employ someone my age?"

But he was the only applicant, and I knew he was an excellent photographer and had been for many years a stringer for an international press agency.

Although he claimed some knowledge of computers, saving his work, so necessary when the Penguin News computers crashed at the slightest provocation, never came easy to John.

"Oh gosh" or, on one occasion, "I know wherein the Devil resides" coming from his side of the desk would signal that once again John had lost everything he had been working on all day. The plus side was that he had lived a fascinating life and was a great raconteur, even if his stories sometimes threatened the achievement of deadlines.

Any kind of delay in getting the paper together put in jeopardy my crucial relationship with Tony Petterssen.

Tony, as the man who printed the Penguin News, loomed large not only in my life but in those of other editors of the paper for many years.

As printer for FIG. Tony was allowed to print the paper on the presses normally employed for the production of the Government's Gazette, but only out of government hours.

Then, as indeed now, Penguin News went to press on an almost daily basis, and if Tony did not receive the necessary pages to print, on time each evening, there were consequences.

These sometimes took the form of threatening phone calls from Tony's wife Heather, about what would happen to his dinner if he didn't soon get home. He would pass on such threats to me with evident relish.

Despite my frequent tardiness and equally frequent problems with antique and cranky presses, or the elaborate collator which folded and assembled the sheets of print into the final product, Tony never failed to have the paper printed and boxed up ready for collection early on the morning of Saturday, the then Penguin News day.

He also saved me from what could have been my most embarrassing moment.

One of the problems with proof reading your own work is that you tend to see what you meant to write, rather than what is on the page. This problem seems to get worse the bigger the typeface used.

One Friday evening, I had sent up to Tony Petterssen the front and back pages, which were then, as now, the last to be printed. I was still in the office when the phone rang and, as I feared, it was Tony.

"It's not my job to proof read your paper, and I've already printed several hundred, but I think you might want to change the headline." That was all he said before putting the phone down.

To my horror, on arriving at the print shop I found that my big headline, which should have read "The Falklands prepares to welcome Princess Anne," in fact read: "The Falklands prepares to welcome Princess Di."

Perhaps my strangest day at Penguin News was one I spent following Princes Anne around West Falkland, rather nervously because her police bodyguard had made it clear that she did not like journalists, and particularly journalists with cameras.

For my part. I tried to keep the flash switched off and for her part, even when at the Port Howard museum, we were briefly the only people in a small room, she made it patently clear that for her I did not exist.

By the end of the day, having observed the royal personage chat vivaciously to practically every human being on West Falkland, and even a couple of horses. without so much as a glance in my direction. I was beginning to wonder if perhaps I really was invisible and had to pinch myself for reassurance.

Still feeling somewhat piqued, when during a subsequent royal visit someone offered to introduce me to Prince Charles in the Goose Green Social Club, I declined the invitation.

Rudeness showed me

AGREEING to join the Penguin News was one of the quickest decisions I ever made. But bearing in mind I had only very recently obtained an English degree, given birth to my son and got married (in that order), rapid life changes, in any case, appeared to be the very exciting order of the day.

I was working as a personal assistant to the then Manager of Consolidated Fisheries Ltd and, if I am entirely honest, I found him to be a bit of a pain in the backside.

Just a few days earlier, having spent a week in hospital nursing an asthmatic baby, on my return to work my boss described my child's indisposition as "inconvenient."

Still snorting with righteous anger, 1 received a call from John Fowler inviting me to be his Deputy Editor. 1 agreed to join him almost before he completed his sentence.

So from a brand new desk, gleaming office, polished floor and state of the art PC I skipped happily into the arms of an organisation that prided itself on its ex rubbish-tip chairs, and third-hand computers that required a hearty punch in the monitor in order to correct the screen colour from lurid orange to a more readable lime green. Still, somehow it felt like coming home.

My first assignment, I recall, involved a trip to the old FIDF Hall to photograph the latest batch of recruits proudly receiving their berets.

With my husband involved in the ceremony and myself unable to find a baby sitter. I tentatively wheeled said child into the testosterone-fuelled atmosphere of the drill hall, whereupon he proceeded to scream his head off throughout the entire ceremony.

So, having captured the images on camera I left in something of a fluster and, just outside the door, the camera fell from my grasp, the film rolled out and an entire week's worth of photos was lost. To give John his due, when I called to break the news, his voice didn't for one second betray

the concern he must have felt at the questionable quality of journalist he'd hired, as he kindly reassured his sobbing deputy over the phone: "Never mind, not to worry, we'll think of something to fill the spaces in the paper."

Happily I managed to avoid any other real disasters from there on in, and life settled down to writing, photographing, developing, arranging and chopping, all the

while adjusting to the daily deadlines imposed on us by long-suffering government printer, Tony Pettersson.

Rather than sending a completed draft to print on a Thursday afternoon, the Penguin News is in fact produced over a series of daily deadlines. So, if nothing much happens between print day on Friday and a Monday or Tuesday deadline... well, you damn well have to produce the pages anyway.

So there I was, innocently marvelling at what a fascinating, fun and mind-expanding career I had happened upon when John just ups and leaves. All of a sudden my lovely avuncular boss was the new Manager of the Tourist Board and I was running the Penguin News with the responsibility of writing a weekly editorial. To be perfectly frank. I was crapping myself.

Still, for all of my very real fears. I admit to a degree of irritation at the Media Trust who, clearly convinced that the Penguin News was not entirely safe in the hands of such a young chick, scrabbled around rather frantically and produced a "mature" male to be my deputy.

As it happened, Tony Burnett and I got along like a house on fire and, to be fair, he generally felt far more embarrassed than I if a stranger entered the office and jumped to the conclusion that he was boss man and I was sidekick.

Apart from Tony's rather too-poetic nature (meaning a great deal of my time was spent editing superlatives from his prose) and his Agony Aunt tendencies ("for God's

the best way forward

sake Tony, get her off the phone and do some work") his superb sense of humour and excellent writing skills were a massive asset to the team and made life a whole lot easier.

The third member of the Penguin News at that time was school leaver Natalie Finn who, with something of a knack for figures, took over our accounts. In the times between hangovers, teenage angst and various heartbreaks. Natalie too was an excellent team member and entertained me endlessly – pragmatist that she was – with her constant taunting of poor Tony with regard to his "medallion man" chest hair and amorous flights of fancy.

Eventually, though, Tony moved on to the Radio Station and Natalie into agricultural training, so the team changed again.

The Penguin News' longest standing staff member Fran Biggs stepped into Natalie's shoes and never looked back. However, Tony was harder to replace at that time and, due to a variety of difficulties (including a replacement deputy with a drinking problem). Fran and I found ourselves producing the paper all alone for a few months – an exhausting but occasionally hilarious time that cemented the great friendship Fran and I still have today.

Eventually our team was completed when I was able to poach the exceedingly able Jenny Cockwell. But I should move on to what I hope were some notable changes made during my time as Editor. In the first place – and much to John's chagrin – the moment he left I added four more pages. And later another four.

He still declares to this day that I only did it to make myself look good (which is of course true) and to make him look bad (well, he did drop me in the deep end).

Also, so worried was I that I would never be able to match John's dry wit in the editorial, I decided unadulterated rudeness and confrontation was the best way forward.

This seemed to go down an absolute storm with the readers, apart from such

times as when Norman Clark burst into the office and berated me soundly while wildly brandishing a rolled up newspaper – shortly followed by Miggs Cofre furiously waggling another copy of the same offending paper.

This took place on Fran's first day of work and afterwards she crept up to me wide-eyed and inquired in a voice that shook: "Is it always like this, because I'm not sure I like it..."

Of course it wasn't like that every day, but being ranted at was pretty much standard on Friday. So much so that we took to hiding at the Seamen's Mission with coffee and cake on publication day.

I will admit now, though, that occasionally when resigning myself to the full force of a reader's fury/upset/amusement. I often had absolutely no idea what they were on about. The editorial was written on Wednesday so by the time it was read on Friday or later I had invariably forgotten the topic.

I quickly learned to call upon such helpful phrases as "I'm so sorry you feel that way," or "absolutely. I take your point." while frantically trying to find a clue to the subject matter of my column.

Other changes included a brief move to the FIC owned house at Crozier Place, and then to the paper's current residence on Ross Road, all the while leaping wholeheartedly into the digital and internet age.

Reducing the Penguin News' government funded subsidy to zero was probably my proudest achievement during that time. This came about when Media Trust Member Mike Rendell suggested we create a Penguin News Cruise Ship Supplement (later to become the Visitors Guide) and sell the resulting publications to the Tourist Board.

It was an excellent idea and, with income from that, combined with Fran's ever increasing advertising sales, it was with great delight that we were eventually able to say "thanks but no thanks" to the Falkland Islands Government.

Not merely a job, but

MY stint at Penguin News started at the beginning of the new millennium when I took up the role of Deputy Editor, working with Editor Lisa Riddell (nee Watson), in January 2000.

Having had no journalistic training whatsoever I wasn't overly confident of getting the job when I first popped into the Penguin News office to inquire about the vacancy.

However, one look at the relieved face of Lisa, who had been doing both jobs for the best part of four months after her former deputy turned out to be a chronic alcoholic, meant I knew the job was mine.

I arrived at the Penguin News at a time when the Falklands were finally starting to catch up with technology; well, after a fashion. The first digital camera was in use, meaning much less time was wasted in the darkroom, and the computers and publishing package were rehable-ish – they only crashed on average a few times a day.

Advances in technology now see the Penguin News provided to the Print Shop (who took over the contract when the government's printing office was privatised) on a tiny little memory stick, a far cry from the days when we would sprint over to Tony Pettersson behind the Secretariat, clutching hard copies of the paper, hoping the wind wouldn't rob us of the front page.

In some ways, by the time I was editor, the improvements in technology meant the job was so less stressful than it had been for my predecessors, I almost felt a fraud when we would reach our Thursday afternoon deadline with time to spare.

I felt I should have been shouting at the staff about clocks ticking, but instead we would (normally) saunter up to the Print Shop then have time to sit back and chat about the week that was before the working day ended.

The way people communicate with the Penguin News has changed too.

Readers are now more inclined to knock

out an impulsive email in situations where they might have previously considered, then changed their minds about writing a letter, arguably giving a more honest opinion – and feedback is immediate.

If we published something readers didn't like, we knew about it immediately; thankfully, the same applied to content that was favourably received.

At the same time, readers have become much more relaxed in dealing with the Penguin News and more inclined to approach the paper with leads for stories, something which is especially appreciated in the quieter winter months when half the population seems to bugger off north on holiday and news often dries up.

It is phone calls to and from readers – especially those in Camp – which particularly pay off at that time of year.

Much of the growing of the Penguin News during my tenure was due to the two other staff members – Deputy Editor Sharon Jaffray and office manager Fran Biggs.

Sharon, who joined the staff when Lisa moved over to the radio station and 1 was promoted, brought a wealth of knowledge with her, particularly about farming, something that I was happy to admit I knew little about.

Her value to the paper shouldn't be underestimated, and having someone who had lived on the West for many years opened doors to stories that we had been trying to prise open for years. And she wasn't shy about asking difficult questions, an important quality in a journalist.

Fran is the unacknowledged power behind the Penguin News, something which largely goes by unnoticed because she is a quiet and shy person. When the decision was made that the Penguin News could function without a subsidy from FIG, it could have spelt a difficult time for the

paper but Fran's keen eye, watching every penny that went in and out, meant that the business finances slowly began to build up to a healthy level.

It was during these years that the

nickname The Rottweiler was given to Fran. Anyone who has been accosted by her about an unpaid bill will know why.

Perhaps surprisingly, I find it difficult to choose particular stories that stand out from my ten years with the Penguin News, but a lesson learned was that it was always impossible to predict how the public would react to items.

In the weeks where we thought we had rattled cages and found a shocking exposé, the response was normally a resounding silence. Instead, it was the apparently innocuous stories that got readers shouting down the phone, bombarding the letters page

or sobbing in the office: a case in point being the saga surrounding the future of electricity meter cards, which resulted in not only public outrage but a civil servant threatening me with legal action.

It was a difficult decision to leave the Penguin News, as to me it was more than just a job; it was a 24-hour occupation.

Wherever you went, people had leads for stories and, on many occasion, I would stumble out of a pub at the end of a night with notes scribbled on bar mats, ready to be deciphered on Monday morning.

While sometimes it would have been nice to just go out and be off duty, I always found it a good indication that Falkland Islanders saw the Penguin News as their paper. I hope this remains the case.





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Pioneering bid to salute the first Island families

A DESCENDANT of one of the Falklands' oldest families has called for a special day to be established to recognise the children born as first generation Islanders.

Dennis May, whose great grandfather John Cranmer Betts was born in 1859, wants all Islanders to raise a glass to the "forgotten pioneers" on December 29 - the 150th anniversary of his birth. And he suggests Islanders set up a petition to commemorate

"Proneers Day" every year Mr May, who was born on Pebble Island and raised in Fitzroy Road, Stanley, says December 29 is "a significant date in the evolutionary calendar of the modern Falkland Islands.

And, he says, hundreds of Islanders could trace their lineage to his great grandfather.

According to Mr May's research, those who bear the names Carey, McPhee, Burns, Short, Biggs, Morrison, Blackley, Millet, Hansen, Peck, Norris, Whitlock, Harrison, Evans, May and many more are his descendants.

John Cranmer Betts was the first Betts born in the Falklands, following approval by the Colonial Lands and Emigration Commission in England in the 1840s to encourage people to emigrate to the new colony.

He was the first-born child of John Betts and Margaret Johnson, who married the previous year in Stanley, and went on to have 18 children.

"John Betts senior was the son of James Betts, a weaver/farm labourer from Norfolk," says Mr May. "He had decided to become a mariner, and in 1855 sailed from Swansea on the 779-ton barque Carleton and was shipwrecked off Cape Carysfort.

He survived the shipwreck and remained in the Falklands, working initially as mate on the Allen Gardiner, a ship owned by the South American Missionary MERRY CHRISTMAS AND A HAPPY NEW YEAR TO ALL OUR READERS

Society (SAMS) which carried native Fuegian Indians to the mission on Keppel Island.

It was during this time that he met and married Margaret Johnson, who we think worked for the Mission Society, and they brought up their family on Keppel Island. "John Cranmer Betts was

born there and he was given the middle name Cranmer after the mission on Keppel Island, known

"There are hundreds of descendants of John Cranmer Betts who were born in the

Falklands," says Mr May. "It seems such an incredible injustice that those first pioneers, whose children shaped the culture and economy of the modern Falkland Islands, seem to have been forgotten for their contribution.'

Mr May, who joined the Navy after attending boarding school in England, is now retired and living in Dorset.

He says the surname Betts can be traced back as far as 1273 in East Anglia, but he is keen to see the family's contribution to the Falklands, together with those of their contemporaries, officially

recognised: "It is now 150 years since those children were born as first generation Falkland Islanders," says Mr May.

Councillors Roger Edwards, Jan Cheek and Dick Sawle have interests in fishery related business.

The first two papers were concerned with Fishery Access Fees and future options for the Southern Blue Whiting Fishery. It was agreed fees for restricted finfish and illex licences would be increased by 10 per cent, and licence fees remain unchanged in respect of loligo, finfish, skate and ray and toothfish.

Councillor Roger Edwards said fee levels remained unchanged in respect of the Restricted Finfish fishery but as the TAC (total allowable catch) was reduced to one third of the previous level, the fees were adjusted pro rata.

He said there were differing views on the process of setting access fees, so consultants had been contracted to review the process.

The cost of this consultancy is to be paid jointly by the government and the Fisheries Association.

KTV's new mission boldly goes to the edge of space

LOCAL company KTV Ltd has won a contract to build and maintain a new radar at Goose Green as part of a joint project between the British Antarctic Survey and the University of Leicester and funded by the UK's Natural Environment Research Council.

Planning permission was granted in August for the high-frequency radar to be situated in a paddock to the south of Goose Green settlement.

Work on the site has just begun and, when completed in late January, the radar will comprise 16 antennas supported on 15-me-

A Titan effort

AIRBIDGE flights have been secured until at least May 10. with news that UK charter airline Air Titan will provide aircraft after the Christmas and New Year period.

The airbridge is currently being covered by Air Tahiti Nui, a Paris registered airline, which took over the MoD route after previous operator Flyglobespan went bust. A MoD spokesperson said replacements had been identified until such time as a permanent operator could get their aircraft leasing and licensing requirements addressed.

Kidney visits

MORE than 46 people visited Kidney Island this month, in a series of visits funded equally by the UK Foreign and Com-monwealth Office's Overseas Territories Environmental Programme and Falklands Conservation. As part of the Cobb's Wren Conservation project, formed to address the conservation needs of the bird, further visits are planned for March next year.

Argentine bid

ARGENTINA'S largest energy company says it is going to invest \$100m in a search for oil and gas in the Falklands basin. YPF, the South American arm of Spanish oil giant Repsol, said on Tuesday its exploration work would take place 180 miles off the coast of Patagonia. The company says it has earmarked \$1.6 billion for investment on "refining and logistics" over the next three years.

Shear skill

THE Falkland Shears competition will be held at the Goose Green shearing shed on December 30, starting at 10am. The Islands' top shearers will be competing for positions at the Golden Shears in Wales in July 2010, so go along and cheer them on. A burger van and licensed bar will be open on the day.

Scott patrol

HMS SCOTT has been deployed to the Antarctic to take up the patrol duties normally undertaken by HMS Endurance. Commissioned in 1997, HMS Scott is a younger, larger ship than her predecessor and has completed a full and highly successful refit, including stateof-the-art sonar equipment.

Drill approval

THE Governor is to seek approval from the Secretary of State for Desire Petroleum to drill six wells in the North Falkland Basin.

Wool subsidy for farmers

FARMERS are to receive a flat rate subsidy for the transportation of wool and sheep for the current season.

The previous Executive Council instructed the Development Corporation in September to make funds available for a freight subsidy, following an extraordinary meeting before the council was dissolved.

Executive Council last week discussed a transportation subsidy and interim arrangements for the 2009/2010 season, and approved the flat rate subsidy of £3.80 per bale, as set by the previous Exco.

Councillor Roger Edwards said wool was already being carried by hauliers who had set their rates to cater for the flat rate, however as movement of sheep was yet to begin, a rate would be set later after further consultation.

He said to reduce impact on the West roads, Workboat Services was authorised to undertake two voyages to Albemarle to collect sheep, and that the container rate and a consolidation service to Fox Bay would be thoroughly investigated early in the New Year, along with all aspects of transportation.

Brussels man for EU issues

THE Legislative Assembly is considering employing a Brussels based consultant to gain greater knowledge of the European Union (EU).

It was decided at last week's Executive Council meeting that the Falkland Islands should not stand for the Executive Committee at the OCTA meeting in March 2010, but that a further paper should be submitted to the February ExCo to consider employing a consultant to attend the bi-monthly meetings.

Further FIGAS review of trial shuttle service

A SUB group of four Legislative Assembly members is to study the financial outcomes of the yearlong trial shuttle service provided by the Falkland Islands Government Air Service.

"We need to get final figures clarified, and I don't think the figures in LegCo properly reflected things like the cost of stores and depreciation which also have to be accounted for as part of the system," said Councillor Jan Cheek.

In response to a question during Friday's Legislative Assembly, as to whether there had been any financial saving since the introduction of the Recovery Plan, Cllr Sharon Halford said the short answer was yes, and that a saving on the public purse had been achieved as well as a reduction in cash expenditure.

As to whether it was time to revert to the taxi service which appeared to suit the majority of users, Cllr Halford said it was extremely important to consider and balance "what is to be lost and what is to be gained."

She said the taxi system might be more convenient for some travellers, and remove any conflicts between local community needs and those of tourists. But, on the minus side, there would be no commercially generated revenue from the tourism industry and the public subsidy, this figure, estimated to be in the region of £500,000 by 2013/14 - would be greater.

"Firstly, as there are a number of current opportunities that FIG believe may lead to increased commercial revenue - and should these be successful will lead to greater efficiency - and secondly, as it is believed that some adjustments to the local service can be made to solve some of the current inconveniencies, it is very difficult to comtemplate a return to the FIGAS air taxi service," said Cllr Halford.

Overdue medals for soldiers



Pressures of life on Legislative Assembly

FAMILY pressures have cut short the council careers of several members, Legislative Assembly spokesperson Jan Cheek has told the Penguin News.

"It's not easy, particularly for families," she said. "I've experienced many years ago being a councillor's wife, and it's quite hard to hear your nearest and dearest being there's no polite word for it being slagged off at every turn. It's not a job for someone who's going to take it to heart.

"You've got to be able to compartmentalise to a degree, and know that you're doing your best, but I know people who have given up in the past, and people who have not stood again, simply because of the pressure it puts on their family."

Councillor Cheek said the job currently required a commitment of "at least 50 per cent," but she believed there would come a time when councillors would be taken on full-time, although there was still resistance to the idea.

They are living in a friend's cottage outside of town and are arranging a caravan next to their flooded house but, they say, it will be many months before they get back into the house proper.



New CBF once cheated death in a helicopter ditching at sea

THE new Commander of the British Forces in the South Atlantic is a former Falklands veteran, who once cheated death when his helicopter ditched at sea.

Commodore Philip Thicknesse, who was awarded the US bronze star for his work as Royal Navy commander of the coalition Naval Training Team, rebuilding the Iraqi Navy at Umm Qasr Naval Base, joined the Royal Navy in 1978, having been educated at Downside School.

After passing out of Dartmouth he read History at Lancaster University, before returning to the Fleet in 1981. He served on the Assault Ship HMS Fearless during the Falklands war, and was the second in command of the Argentine Prize Yehuin.

Following a tour as the Gunnery Officer of HMS Jersey, a Fishery Protection Vessel, he transferred to the Fleet Air Arm as a helicopter pilot. Awarded the Kelmsley Trophy as the top Anti Submarine Warfare pilot graduating from Flying Training in 1986, he joined 820 Naval Air Squadron, flying ASW Seakings from HMS Ark Royal. In late 1986

he survived a ditching, following a catastrophic mechanical failure, escaping from the wreckage underwater with two crewmates.

The following year he trained as a Principal Warfare Officer and served as the Underwater Warfare Officer on the Destroyer HMS Birmingham, before returning to the Fleet Air Arm and the Lynx helicopter as the Squadron Aviation Officer for the Ninth Frigate Squadron, and Flight Commander on HMS Norfolk, the first Type 23 Frigate.

In 1993 he attended the Naval Staff Course at Greenwich, where he read for an MA in Defence Studies. From there he joined the Royal Yacht Britannia as First Lieutenant, following which he commanded HMS Leeds Castle, the Falklands Patrol Ship.

Promoted to Commander in 1996, he joined the Directing Staff at the Royal Military College of Science in an Army Air Corps post. During his final year at the college, he co-authored and published Military Rotorcraft, A Brassey's textbook. Appointed back to sea, he commanded the Frigate HMS Westminster, and conducted a wide range of national tasking and a NATO deployment with the Standing Naval Force Atlantic. He was then appointed as the MA to the Second Sea Lord.

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Promoted to Captain in 2003, he joined the MoD as Director of the Defence Crisis Management Centre and AD Contingent Operations in the Directorate of Joint Commitments. Following that, in 2006, he deployed to Iraq to command the coalition Naval Training Team, rebuilding the Iraqi Navy at Umm Qasr Naval Base.

On his return to the UK he took command of Royal Naval Air Station Culdrose, home to five aircraft types, 11 squadrons and 3,000 personnel. He left Culdrose in late 2008 to spend a year as Director of the Maritime Warfare Centre, before being selected for promotion to Commodore and appointed as Commander British Forces South Atlantic Islands.





our seasons in one stamp issue

NEW Island father and daughter team Ian and Georgina Strange are the photographers behind a stamp issue in January which features dramatic images of the Islands' weather.

A unique feature of the Falkland Islands are the quickly changing weather patterns, bringing a beauty to the Islands' landscapes which are often rare in many other parts of the world.

The Naturalist Charles Darwin made two relatively short visits to the east of East Falkland in the mid 1800s. Describing the

landscape and the Islands' weather, his portrayal of "extreme desolation" with its dreary weather environment has been bestowed upon the Falkland Islands for more than 100 years, sustained by many writers who, with no firsthand experience themselves, took his descriptions as correct.

The images shown in this fourstamp issue, "Atmospheres: Four Seasons," attempt to portray a different and more accurate of the Islands' picture environment, how its continually

changing weather produces a very different image to the one Darwin described, and how these create their own form of beauty on the Islands landscape.

To be released on January 25, the stamps follow the four seasons:

Spring (27p) depicts an early morning scene on Carcass Island with mist rolling in from the sea, helping to create the rich greens of the pastures.

Summer (55p) features the pollution-free atmosphere resulting in intense light and highly

reflective blue skies. This tranquil scene was taken on New Island.

Autumn (65p) demonstrates how March and April can bring some of the Islands' most spectacular weather images. A low evening light with intermittent rain showers produced this double rainbow over Stanley. Winter (£1.10) is illustrated by

the unusual coloured skies which often are created from long periods of calm weather, tempered by the Islands' marine environment.



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

How a simple day on the farm can capture so many timeless moments

IT'S not witnessing an animal being slaughtered in a paddock - albeit with the precision of a .44 Magnum - which resonates most strongly among the images I retain from my day at Long Island. Nor is it the idyllic sight of a dozen horses

being driven across the sandbar at low tide.

And it's not even my first meeting with a fur seal, somewhat disgruntled at my interruption of its afternoon snooze on a deserted beach.

It's the warmth and companionship which envelops Glenda and Neil Watson's home when I join their family on what for them is just another Saturday on the farm.

When I set out I have no intention of writing a feature for the Penguin News. But when I look back and appreciate their hospitality - just an ordinary Falklands farming family going about their daily business - I realise what a rich impression it has left upon me.

I have known their daughter Lisa since lodging at her house when I arrived here from Australia in June. It is through Lisa I have made my first friends in the Falklands, but this is the first time have been to her parents' home.

That it entails an early rise on a Saturday - so Lisa can catch the tide to gather horses off the island - is for me the only disconcerting moment of the day.

With brother Ben in tow, we drive over Wall Mountain and alongside Goat Ridge before making our approach past Estancia and along the road that dissects Mount Kent Farm.

We take the first right on the Port Louis road past the rusted remains of a fallen Argentine helicopter.

Slowly coming into focus on the horizon, I see the red-roofed silhouette of Glenda and Neil's place, a modest two-up two-down farmhouse sitting exposed on the low lying moors, well removed from the more sheltered position it could have occupied among the foothills of Long Island Mountain.

I met Neil for the first time two nights prior. Or at least I feel as though I have, having seen him feature in the remarkable DVD documentary Falklands: The Islanders' Story.

I remain intensely touched by the Islanders' tales of occupation, and I am delighted to greet him in person.

When I discover he is, like me, a lifelong, Manchester United supporter, our kinship is assured.

Glenda and Neil only travel into Stanley when they need to, not least because so many family and friends visit them on a regular basis.

Today Ben has been charged with topping up their supplies: loo rolls, wine and the latest edition of the Penguin News among them.

The fact he has left them at home in Stanley possibly through the same Saturday morning

affliction as my own - doesn't really faze them much. Especially as the editor is there to give them a first-hand update of the week's biggest stories.

A plate of bacon and eggs sets me up ahead of the first outing of the day, a recce along the beach with Lisa to visit the fur seal they had spotted earlier. The seal responds in predictable fashion, growling at me to stay off its turf. Or grunts to that effect.

Back at the house, the seats in the living room are filling fast. Son Paul, grandsons Ryan and Nathan, friends Linda and Bean and their granddaughter Pearl are also here to pay a visit.

But Lisa and Ryan have a tide to meet, and they select their saddles and gear from the old farmstead 50 metres away.

Now a musty and character-filled outhouse. this was in 1926 the birthplace of Glenda's father David McKay, some 50 years after it was built.

Faithful steeds Hope and Dixie are briefed on their task for the day: to round up a dozen other horses from the island, half an hour's ride away, and to escort them back to the corral for their end-of-winter inspection and workout.

While the pair disappear across the paddocks, my host and I reminisce about the Busby Babes, and Neil recites every name from the 1957 team line-up, memorised ever since he was a 15-year-

Glenda interrupts us: "Don't you boys think you should be talking less about football and getting your backsides out there to see if Lisa and

Ryan are doing OK?" We concur and, like a pair of admonished schoolboys, board Neil's 4WD and park up at the southern end of the sandbar.

We spot a handful of tiny figures on the crest of the island, about a mile in the distance. As they breach the water and Lisa drives them across, it's a sight for my sore eyes.

I have ridden horses in years past (one was a derby winner, although it earned that claim to fame some ten years or more before I sat on its back) but I have never worked them in any fashion.

Seeing these fine but bedraggled animals cantering through the shallow breakers reminds me of one of those kitsch prints which used to adorn British living room walls in the 1960s.

It may be a cliché in the art world, but in real life it's a quite glorious image.

With the horses safely corralled, it's time to monitor the progress of Ben and Paul, who have taken a quad and a motorbike in the opposite direction to round up 30-head of cattle.

Charles Dickson and Mark McPhee have arrived to give the boys a hand and, under Neil's watchful eye, their captives warily shuffle around in the circular pen.

Eleven are selected for release to graze elsewhere on the station. They are deemed fine prospects, and another season will see them carrying fine quality meat.

The remainder spend the rest of the day in the lock-up, except for one grumpy old ox, whose day is about to end rather abruptly.

I ask Neil why, if its carcass is not fit for human consumption, its fate must be determined so summarily, instead of allowing it to live out its life in ignorant bliss.

"It's simple, Tony," he tells me. "They can do terrible damage to the fences, and it's just not sensible to have more stock than you need. We don't need this one - but it'll do for dog mince."

Charles wraps his lasso around the unfortunate's horns, ties the other end of the rope to the towbar of the Rover, and it's dragged out of the pen.

It drops with an expertly aimed shot to the head from Charles' Remington .44 Magnum rifle, and Paul slits its throat in an instant.

As soon as the dead beast's reflex actions have expired and its legs have stopped kicking, a bloodied grass trail follows the 4WD as the carcass is dragged across the paddock behind the house to the gallows - or, more properly, a palinkey - by the lake.

I have never before seen an animal shot, let alone skinned within ten minutes of its life, and I'm fascinated by the whole operation.

It's expertly carried out, and with such clinical precision there's something almost morbidly artistic about the whole process.

Paul slices out the tongue, Charles hoists it up to hang, footloose and not so fancy free any more, and young Ryan slings the head into the

Noone particularly wants to saw through the skull for the meagre pickings of the brains, delicate though they are reputed to be, but I imagine the heart and tail may be claimed for the tasty morsels they can produce on the kitchen table. We regroup back in the lounge, sink another

Hein or two, and reflect on a productive day.

The Watsons host cruise ship visitors during the summer season and, although Neil is reluctant to admit, Glenda proudly tells me he earned a bravery award just two years ago when he helped rescue a party of elderly passengers after their Zodiac overturned on the approach to his beach.

Neil had advised them not to attempt to negotiate that day's choppy waters, and it could have cost one or two frail tourists their lives.

This season's guests will have just two hours at the homestead, having been bussed across from their disembarkation at Stanley, although they will have the opportunity to enjoy a yarn with Glenda and Neil.

I have soaked up many more hours in their company and, while it has been an unremarkable day in their farming lives, I feel enormously privileged to have counted one of my days among theirs

And to have learned a lot more about what it means to be a Falkland Islander.



On contract for a quarter century
