Sir

I would like to bring to the notice of the Administrator the conditions at present in force regarding the importation of dogs into the Colony . At present there seems to be no adequate means of quarantining any dog brought into the place . I would suggest that as at times, dogs are liable to be brought into the country , and as at present there is no place to quarantine them , a place should be constructed at the quarantine station to accomodate, say two dogs . This would not cost very much and by doing so it would be possible to obviate hardship to any one wishing to bring a dog into the country ; and at the same time guard against an outbreak of Distemper , which I understand has been introduced once before into the Falklands , with serious result to the sheep dogs . There is at present a regulation in force for quarentining dogs , but no place for doing so
