2. From p 3 of ① the Assistant Stock Inspection report in ref 535/22 it ^{seems that} ~~states~~ that Mr. Peck put the ewe flock in quarantine. No action was taken under sec. 1 of the Ordinance (which is probably not applicable) and the only effect of the order could have been to warn the owner not to move the sheep.

3. No special permission is necessary for Mr. McGill to drive the 200 sheep but he should be warned of sec. 30 of the Ordinance whereby he is liable to a penalty if any of the sheep driven by him are found to be affected with lice. A reply be sent accordingly.

Sir,

I am directed by the Governor to acknowledge the receipt of your application of the 10th instant for permission to drive 200 sheep from Rincon Grande to Stanley.

2. I am to inform you in reply that, while it does not appear that any special permission is necessary, you will be liable under the law to a penalty not exceeding five pounds and not less than one pound for every day during which such sheep shall be driven, if they are affected with lice.
