Dear Sir.

I have the honour to request that you will see into the following -
On Monday 11th at midday I removed my yearling from the Pound, releasing the same on the Common in the evening of same day. This animal was again impounded on Tuesday. I took same from the Pound, after paying under protest. I have this evening inspected the Common fence & have found that this animal enters a gateway at the back of Mrs. Nielson's residence & goes through the front of same into the town. I am not adverse to paying poundage under fair conditions & hope that you will give this your fair consideration.


Sir,
