There are no Military Posts or Works of any kind.

There are no buildings of any kind built at the expense of the Ordnance Department, or belonging to that Department.

The Troops are accommodated in cottages and quarters erected by the Colonial Government out of the Land Revenues of the Colony; the annual value of these buildings may be computed at £ 320⁰ 0⁰

The aggregate repairs on the above for the past year amounted to about £ 14⁰ 0⁰. And the Colonial

contribution of Coal for the Guard Room may be estimated at £ 20 making the total expenses of the Garrison, as follows, viz:

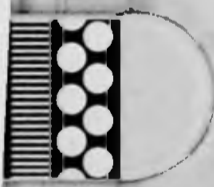
