FALKLAND ISLANDS.

PROCLAMATION ON GRAZING LEASES, 4th. April 1861.

1. Any person may, on application to the Governor, and on payment of 5l. into the colonial treasury, obtain a licence to occupy a station.
2. Every such licence will be given in writing, and be for one year only, and not renewable.
3. Every station will contain as near 6,000 acres as may be convenient, having regard to natural boundaries. The boundaries of each station shall be determined by the Surveyor-General, with the approval of the Governor.
4. At any time before the expiration of the licence, the licensee may obtain a lease for 10 years of his station, at a rent of 10l. a year, provided he proves, to the satisfaction of the Governor, that he has built on the land a house, of wood or stone walls, not less than 24 feet by 12 feet, and 6 feet high, and has stocked the station with at least 50 cattle or horses, or 100 sheep.
5. It will be a condition of the lease that, during its continuance, the station shall be kept stocked with at least the number of Stock before specified, and also be occupied by the lessee or any person in his employment, and, in case of any failure in this condition, it shall be lawful for the Governor to resume possession of the Station.
6. The lessee of any station must, within five years from the date of his lease, purchase, at the upset price of land for the time being (not exceeding eight shillings an Acre,) a section containing not less than 160 Acres; and may also at any time during his lease purchase any further quantity of land in his station at the same price.
7. If the lessee of any station under this proclamation, or under the proclamation issued by Governor Rennie on the 31st. of July 1849, shall be desirous of obtaining an extension of his lease, he shall give notice thereof to the Governor six months before the expiration of his lease, and the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, determine whether it is expedient that the land shall be sold or reserved for any public purpose. If the land be not required for sale or otherwise, then the Governor may grant to the lessee an extension of his lease for five years on the same terms as to rent and occupation as the first lease; provided that no lessee under the said proclamation of July 31st. 1849, shall receive an extension of his lease for more than 6,000 acres, and provided also that no such lessee shall receive an extension of his lease unless all the districts leased by him are stocked and occupied in manner herein before required.

as the Governor and Council for the time being may determine.



8. Every lease under this proclamation, or the proclamation of the 31st. July 1849, shall be transferable, subject only to the condition of giving notice of such transfer to the Colonial Secretary.

9. The rent of each station shall be paid by the lessee to the Colonial Secretary at Stanley, yearly, in advance, from the day of the grant of the lease, and if delay be made in such payment the Colonial Secretary shall, within two months after the rent is due, send notice thereof to the lessee (if in Stanley,) and if the rent be not paid within one month after such notice or (if the lessee be not resident in Stanley,) if the rent be not paid within six months after it is due, the lease shall be null and void, and the Governor may resume possession of the station without making to the former lessee any compensation.

10. No licence shall be granted to occupy any station within six miles, by land, of Stanley, or of any township which may hereafter be proclaimed.

11. Every station leased and every block of land sold under these regulations shall be as far as possible of a square figure, of which not more than one side shall have available water frontage.

12. Every lease shall confer the right to use the land for pastoral purposes, and shall be subject to all such reservations as are contained in the printed Crown grants of land in this Colony, and the Governor shall have power, at any time, to proclaim a public road through any station.

13. No person shall be licensed under the first clause of this proclamation to occupy more than one station at the same time, and no lessee of any districts under the said proclamation of the 31st July 1849 shall be licensed to occupy a station unless the said districts shall be stocked and occupied in manner herein-before required.

14. Every station shall be defined with reference to the nautical chart of the Colony, without requiring any further survey.

## FALKLAND ISLANDS.

### PROCLAMATION RESPECTING WILD CATTLE, 5th April 1861.

His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes known, that any person holding a licence or lease of a station under the proclamation of 4th of April 1861, and any person holding a grazing district under the proclamation of 31st of July 1849, if the same be actually occupied, may obtain a licence to capture and kill wild cattle for his own use on the following conditions:--

1. Every person shall pay for each ox, bull, or cow captured 14 shillings, and for each calf running with the cow one shilling.

2. Where it appears that the number of wild bulls is excessive, the Governor may grant to any holder of Land as aforesaid permission to kill the same on payment of 4s. each.

3. In order to prevent interference among different Licencees, the Governor shall prescribe the limits within which each Licencee may kill or capture cattle.

4. Every animal captured under these regulations shall be branded with the brand of the owner, which brand shall be registered in the office of the Colonial Secretary when the Licence is issued.

5. Every person holding a Licence under this proclamation shall make a declaration every six months of the number and description of animals killed or captured by him during the preceding six months, and pay the fees thereon to the Colonial Secretary.

6. The Licence of any person making a false declaration shall be revoked.

7. Every Licence granted under these regulations, and the number and description of animals killed and captured under each Licence, shall be published from time to time on the Government Gazette Board.

8. On sufficient cause being shown, the Governor may, if he thinks fit, grant to any person, not being a holder of Land as aforesaid, a Licence to kill on Crown Lands such wild cattle as he may require for consumption only, on payment of a fee of 1l. for each animal.

over the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies.

WHEREAS, it is desirable to amend the Land Proclamation of the 4th. April 1861 so far as regards the unoccupied Lands of the Crown on the West Falkland and Islands adjacent thereto :

It is hereby notified for general information that the following are the terms and conditions on which from and after this date those Lands as aforesaid will be granted.

The disposal of the unoccupied Lands of the Crown on the East Falkland will continue to be regulated, as heretofore, by the Proclamation of the 4th. April 1861.

1. Any person may on application to the Governor, and on payment at the rate of (£5.) Five Pounds per 6,000 acres, obtain a License to occupy a station on the West Falkland Island or the Islands adjacent thereto.
2. Every such License will be given in writing and be for one year only and not renewable, and will be subject to such conditions and regulations as may be prescribed by the Governor.
3. The extent of each station will be determined by the Governor, the boundaries thereof by the Surveyor General with the approval of the Governor.
4. At any time before the expiration of the License the Licensee may obtain a Lease of his station for 20 years at a rental of (£10.) Ten Pounds a year for each 6,000 acres, provided he proves to the satisfaction of the Governor, that he has built on the land a house of wood or stone walls not less than 24 feet by 12 feet and 6 feet high, and has stocked his land in the proportion of at least 50 cattle or horses or 100 sheep to each 6,000 acres.
5. It will be a condition of the Lease that, during its continuance, the station shall be kept stocked with at least the number of stock before specified and also be occupied by the Lessee or any person in his employment, and in case of any failure in this condition, it shall be lawful for the Governor to resume possession of the Station.
6. The Lessee of any station must within five years from the date of his Lease purchase a portion of his Leasehold Land in one or more blocks as may be most convenient, in the proportion of 160 acres to each 6,000 acres; such land to be purchased at the upset price of land for the time being, not exceeding (8s.) Eight shillings per acre. And the Lessee may at any time during his Lease purchase any further quantity of land in his station at the same rate of payment.
7. If the Lessee of any station under this Proclamation shall be desirous of obtaining an extension of his Lease he shall give notice thereof to the Governor six months before the expiration of his Lease, and the Governor shall with the advice and consent of the Executive Council determine whether it is expedient that the Land shall be sold or reserved for any public purpose. If the Land be not required for sale or otherwise, then the Governor may grant to the Lessee an extension of his Lease for such time and on such terms and conditions as to rent and occupation as the Governor and Council for the time being may determine.

8. Every Lease under this Proclamation shall be transferable subject only to the condition of giving notice of such transfer to the Colonial Secretary.

9. The rent of each station shall be paid by the Lessee to the Colonial Secretary at Stanley, yearly in advance, from the day of the grant of the Lease, and if delay be made in such payment the Colonial Secretary shall, within two months after the rent is due, send notice thereof to the Lessee (if in Stanley) and if the rent be not paid within one month after such notice or (if the Lessee be not resident in Stanley) if the rent be not paid within six months after it is due, the Lease shall be null and void and the Governor may resume possession of the station without making to the former Lessee any compensation.

10. No License shall be granted to occupy any station within six miles, by land, of any Township which may hereafter be proclaimed.

11. Every Lease shall confer the right to use the land for pastoral purposes, and shall be subject to all such reservations as may be prescribed by the Governor and as are contained in the printed Crown grants of land in this Colony; and the Governor shall have power at any time to proclaim a public road through any station.

12. Every station shall be defined with reference to the nautical chart of the Colony without requiring any further survey.

## ORDINANCE FOR REGULATING THE DISPOSAL OF CROWN LANDS IN THE FALKLAND ISLANDS.

For the year 1871.

Number 4.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to consolidate and amend the Laws and regulations relating to the disposal of the Waste Lands of the Crown in the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies. Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of the said Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council as follows:—

Repeal of previous Law.

1. The Proclamations of the 31st. July 1849, of the 4th. April 1861, of the 24th. June 1867, of the 21st August, 1867, and the 37th. Section of the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance 1853, are hereby repealed saving nevertheless all Estates, Interests, Rights and Renewals created or accruing under or by virtue of such Proclamations or Ordinance respectively.

Short Title.

2. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Land Ordinance 1871."

Interpretation Clause.

3. In this Ordinance the word "block" shall signify 160 acres of land, the word "section" shall signify 6000 acres of land and the word "station" shall signify the whole extent of land comprized in one lease, and (if not inconsistent with the context or subject matter) words of one number or one gender shall import both numbers and all genders respectively. The words "Governor" "Colonial Secretary" and "Surveyor General" shall signify the Officers who may be appointed to perform those duties.

Crown Lands to be sold by Auction only

4. Except as hereinafter mentioned the Waste Lands of the Crown shall be sold in fee simple and by public auction only.

Reserves for Public purposes.

5. It shall be lawful for the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council to reserve and set apart any waste lands of the Crown for Harbours, Defence and Internal Communications, or for the sites of Towns, Villages, Places of Public Worship, Interment Education or Recreation or for any other public purpose whatsoever.

Size and upset price of lots to be fixed by Governor in Council.

6. The size of the lots and the upset price for Town Suburban and Country Lands respectively shall be fixed by the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council, but the upset price shall not be lower than at the rate of £100 per acre for Town Lots, of £2 per acre for Suburban Lots, and 4s. per acre for Country lands.

Country Lands may after Auction be purchased at upset price unless withdrawn from sale.

7. Country Lands if not sold when put up at Auction shall afterwards be open for selection and purchase at the upset price Provided that the Governor may withdraw any such lands from selection and again submit them to public auction and so on from time to time till the lands be sold.

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8. The upset price of Town, Suburban and Country Lands respectively may from time to time be raised or lowered by Her Majesty and Her Successors by any Instruction addressed to the Governor under Her or their Sign Manuel and Signet or through one of the Principal Secretaries of State.

9. All intended sales by Auction of Crown Lands shall be notified by public advertisement in the usual manner not less than one month nor more than three months before the day of sale.

10. It shall be lawful for the Governor in his discretion to grant to Settlers licences to occupy sections of the Waste Lands of the Crown on the following terms and conditions, (1.) each section shall consist of six thousand acres as near as may be, (2.) a sum of Five pounds shall at the time of application for a licence be paid to the Colonial Secretary for the public use in respect of each section applied for (3.) the Licence shall endure for one year only unless it comprises not less than two sections when its duration shall be extended to two years, and (4.) no licence shall be renewable.

11. Before the expiration of a licence the Licencee may obtain from the Governor a lease of the land comprised in his licence for 21 years determinable at the option of the Lessee at the end of the seventh or fourteenth year, provided he proves to the satisfaction of the Governor that each section is at the time of applying for the lease stocked with not less than in the proportion of 50 head of tame cattle or horses or 100 sheep, and that on each section a habitable house of reasonable dimensions has been erected. If however the Lessee holds two or more adjacent sections which in the judgment of the Governor can be properly superintended together it shall be sufficient if there be only one suitable house erected in respect of such sections. The rent to be reserved in such leases shall be at the rate of £6. a year for each section during the first 10 years and of £10. during the remainder of the term. The rent shall be paid yearly in advance to the Colonial Secretary and if not paid within three Calendar months after it has become due or if the land for the like space of three months shall cease to be stocked to the extent hereinbefore specified the lease shall be null and void and the land comprised in it shall revert to the Crown.

12. The Governor shall have power at his discretion to insert in every lease to be granted by him on behalf of the Crown such reservations conditions and restrictions as may seem expedient. Such leases shall contain a clause that every dispute as to boundaries of any Station or Section shall be settled by arbitration in the usual way at the expense of the parties interested.

13. Every Lessee shall within ten years from the date of his lease purchase at the existing upset price of land (not being less than 4s. an acre) a block of not less than 160 acres for every section comprised in his lease. Such block to be determined by the Surveyor General with the consent of the Governor on failure to make such purchase within that period the Lease shall be null and void. The Lessee may at any time during his lease purchase at the same rate any further quantity of the land comprised in his Station that he may require subject however to the limitation hereinafter contained.

14 Every person holding land whether in fee simple or by way of lease or licence shall be entitled to kill and appropriate to his own use any wild cattle that may be on his land. But any person hunting or killing the wild cattle on the lands of the Crown without having first obtained the permission in writing of the Governor shall be subject to the penalties prescribed for that offence by the Ordinance No. 2, of 1869.

15. Every lease under this Ordinance shall be transferable by endorsement on the back of the Lease signed by the Lessee or his Attorney subject to the condition that due notice of such transfer is given to the Colonial Secretary or the officer acting as Colonial Secretary.

16. This Ordinance shall not apply to any land within six miles by land of Stanley or of any Township which may hereafter be proclaimed.

17. Every Section leased and every block of land sold under these regulations shall be as far as possible of a rectangular figure of which not more than one side shall have available water frontage. Provided that no leaseholder under this Ordinance shall be allowed to purchase more than one third of his leasehold land having water frontage without the special leave of the Governor.

18. Should any lessee at any time wish to part with or exchange a portion of his leasehold he shall be permitted to do so on application to and with the sanction of the Governor the boundaries of such portion to be defined by the Surveyor General or by a competent sworn Surveyor at the expense of the parties concerned and such portion to be indicated in the chart of the Colony as a separate lot and numbered accordingly after such transfer shall be duly concluded in the Colonial Secretary's office the rent of the land so parted with shall be charged to the person who thus becomes the lessee. Provided that no transfer of any land less than a section be made under this clause.



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Reservation on the part of the Crown. 19. Every lease shall confer on the lessee the right to use the land for pastoral purposes only and shall be subject to all such reservations as are contained in the printed Crown grants of land in this Colony, and the Governor shall have power at any time to proclaim a public road through any Station.

Six months warning to be given to Governor previous to an extension of Lease being granted. 20. If the lessee of any Station under this Ordinance shall be desirous of obtaining an extension of his lease he shall give notice thereof to the Governor six months before the expiration of his lease and the Governor in Council shall determine whether it is expedient that the land shall be sold or reserved for any public purpose. Provided that the former lessee shall have priority of claim over other persons applying for the lease. If the land be sold the value of any improvements made upon it by the Lessee (such value to be determined by the Surveyor General but in no case exceeding their actual cost) shall be added to the upset price and shall be paid to the lessee by the purchaser of the land or shall be allowed to the Lessee in case he shall be the purchaser.

Boundaries defined. 21 Every Section and Station of land shall be defined with reference to the nautical Chart of the Colony without requiring any further Survey but the boundaries will be subsequently made by the Surveyor General or by a competent Sworn Surveyor and submitted for approval to the Governor.

## AN AMALGAMATION ORDINANCE

OF THE LEASES OF CROWN LANDS IN THE FALKLAND ISLANDS.

By His Excellency Colonel George D'Arcy Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Falkland Islands and the Dependencies thereof, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it has been judged expedient to alter, amend, abrogate, and annul the Ordinances and Proclamations in reference to leases, to define the rights and privileges of lessees, and to amalgamate the leases of the East and West Falkland Islands, be it enacted as follows.

List of Ordinances and proclamations annulled.

1. That the Ordinance No. 5. of the 23. August 1867, the proclamations of the 31st. July 1849, 4th. April 1861, 24th. June 1867, 21st. August 1867, and the 37th. section of the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance 1853, are hereby repealed and annulled as far as all future applicants for land are concerned.

Occupation licences and running leases granted for 7, 14, and 21 years.

2. That Settlers in the East and West Falkland, should be allowed to occupy sections of land on application to the Governor and on payment to the Colonial Secretary at the rate of five pounds for each section of 6,000 acres, this occupation licence will be for one year only, unless the applicant is licensed to occupy any quantity of

land not less than two sections or 12,000 acres, shall be entitled to two years from the date of his license to comply with the conditions hereinafter mentioned, and not renewable, that at any time before the expiration of the License the Licensee may obtain a running or optional lease of seven, fourteen or twenty one years, at the rate of six pounds a year payable in advance to the Colonial Secretary for 6,000 acres for the first ten years of his lease, and afterwards for ten pounds a year also payable in advance, all provided he can prove to the satisfaction of the Governor that the land so let be stocked with fifty head of tame Cattle or Horses, or one hundred Sheep for each section of 6,000 acres, each section of land to have a fair habitable house upon it of reasonable dimensions, unless it can be proved to the Governor's satisfaction, that the occupier, already possesses a house on an adjacent section of land from which the stock on such section can be properly tended.

3. The Lessee of every section must within 10 years from the date of his lease purchase at the upset price of land for the time being not exceeding 2s. an acre a block of land containing not less than 160 acres for every section of 6,000 acres to be determined by the Surveyor General by the consent of the Governor and may also at any time during his lease purchase any further quantity of land in his station at the same rate, and any person desirous of purchasing unleased land may do so at the same rate.

4. That the wild cattle on the West Falkland Islands shall be considered *feræ naturæ* as is now ruled in favour of Lessees in the East Falkland.

5. That Lessees holding land in either the East or West Falkland Islands, can take a new lease under this Ordinance provided always, they have not been Leaseholders more than three years, and also that no rebatement or refunding shall be made for any previous payment for Leases now held by Lessee's. Those who have been Landholders for a longer period must continue to hold their leases under the terms of the Proclamation upon which they were taken out until the expiration of those leases, at which time they may obtain an extension of their leases at the rate of ten pounds for every 6,000 acres as provided in clause No. 2. but in all other respects the terms of this Ordinance are open to them.

6. Every lease under this Ordinance shall be transferable by endorsement on the back of the lease signed by the Lessee or his attorney and the Colonial Secretary subject to the condition of giving notice of such transfer to the Colonial Secretary.

Rents payable in advance.

7. The rent of each station of land shall be paid in advance by the Lessee to the Colonial Secretary at Stanley from the date of the grant of the lease, and if the rent be not paid within three months after it has become due the lease shall be null and void.

Limitation of Station.

8. No licence shall be granted to occupy any station within six miles by land of Stanley or of any township which may hereafter be proclaimed.

Water frontage of Station

9. Every section leased and every block of land sold under these regulations shall be as far as possible of a square figure of which not more than one side shall have available water frontage always provided that no Leaseholder under this Ordinance shall be allowed to purchase more than one third water frontage without the special leave of the Governor.

Portion of Land transferable.

10. That should any holder of a lease at any time wish to part with or exchange a portion of his Leasehold, he shall be permitted to do so on application to, and with the sanction of the Governor, the boundaries of such land to be defined by the Surveyor General or by a competent sworn Surveyor at the expense of the parties concerned and indicated in the chart of the Colony as a separate lot and numbered accordingly and after such transfer shall be duly concluded in the Colonial Secretary's office, the rent of the land to be charged to the person who thus becomes the lessee provided that no transfer of any land less than a section be made under this clause.

Reservation on the part of the Crown.

11. Every lease shall confer the right to use the land for pastoral, agricultural, building, manufacturing purposes and shall be subject to all such reservations as are contained in the printed Crown grants of land in this Colony and the Governor shall have power at any time to proclaim a public road through any station.

Six months warning to be given to Governor previous to an extension of lease being granted.

12. If the Lessee of any Station under this Ordinance shall be desirous of obtaining an extension of lease he shall give notice thereof to the Governor six months before the expiration of his lease and the Governor in Council shall determine whether it is expedient that the land shall be sold or reserved for any public purpose, provided that the former Lessee has priority of claim over other persons applying for the lease.

Boundaries defined.

13. Every section and station of land shall be defined with reference to the nautical chart of the Colony without requiring any further Survey, but the boundaries will be subsequently made by the Surveyor General or by a competent sworn Surveyor and submitted for approval to the Governor.



Interpretation  
clause.

14. That in this Ordinance the word "block" shall throughout signify 160 acres of land, the word "section" signify 6,000 acres of land, and the word "station" signify the whole extent of land taken out by one lease.

15. Whereas the delay incident to a previous communication with Her Majesty to know her royal pleasure hereupon would be productive of serious inconvenience: be it therefore enacted that this Ordinance shall take effect and come into operation from the date of the passing thereof.

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## GAOL REGULATIONS.

By His Excellency Thomas Edward Laws Moore, Esquire,  
Captain in the Royal Navy, Governor and Commander-  
in-Chief of the Falkland Islands and the Dependencies  
thereof, &c. &c. &c.

WHEREAS by the Administration of Justice Ordinance passed in the Preamble.  
year 1853, number ten, it is enacted, "That the building now used  
" as a public gaol in Stanley shall be a house of correction as well  
" as a public gaol, and it shall be lawful for the Governor from time  
" to time to make rules for the government of any such gaol, and  
" for the classification, discipline, and treatment of offenders im-  
" prisoned therein, and for the duties to be performed by the  
" officers of the same:" Now therefore I, the said Governor, do  
hereby, in pursuance of the powers so vested in me, make and publish  
the following rules for the government of the gaol at Stanley.

1. The gaoler shall keep a book in which shall be entered the Gaol book.  
name of every prisoner committed to gaol, the offence for which each  
prisoner is committed, his or her age and nation, and whether he or  
she has been committed before; the gaoler shall also enter in such  
book a note of the conduct of each prisoner in gaol, and such other  
particulars as may be required by the Governor from time to  
time.

2. When any prisoner is committed to the gaol by any court or Report to  
justice the gaoler shall deliver to the Governor a note of the name of Governor.  
such prisoner, his offence, and sentence.

3. All prisoners on entering the gaol must be searched, and every- Prisoners to be  
thing not necessary for their use while in custody must be taken from searched.

4. Every justice of the peace, the colonial chaplain, and the colo- Visiting magis-

5. Prisoners may see their friends every Saturday from twelve until Visitors.

peace to visit a prisoner at any time.

6. No person is allowed to communicate with any prisoner, except Communication  
as above stated; and if any person shall hold or attempt any such forbidden.  
communication the gaoler shall inform the magistrate thereof as soon  
as possible.

7. When any prisoner appears or reports himself to be sick, the Sickmess.  
gaoler shall forthwith inform the colonial surgeon thereof; and the  
gaoler shall carry out all such directions in respect of the diet, work,  
or confinement of such prisoner as the surgeon may direct.

Divine service. 8. When divine service is performed by the chaplain, every prisoner shall (if possible) attend.

Exercise on week-days. 9. Prisoners not at hard labour or in solitary confinement shall be allowed one hour's exercise in the gaol yard every day.

Exercise on Sundays. 10. All prisoners, except those sentenced to solitary confinement, shall be allowed one hour's exercise in the gaol-yard every Sunday.

Safe custody. 11. The prisoners shall be locked up in their respective cells at eight o'clock every evening; and whenever it shall be necessary for the gaoler to leave the gaol, every prisoner shall be first locked up in his respective cell. The doors leading into the gaol-yard and into the gaoler's apartments shall be properly secured when the prisoners are locked up.

Riotous conduct. 12. In case of any riotous conduct or disobedience of orders by any prisoner, the gaoler will take such measures as may be necessary to enforce discipline forthwith, and shall report the case to the stipendiary magistrate as early as possible.

Arrangement of prisoners in cells. 13. When there are more than six prisoners in gaol, three are to be locked up in one cell, and the remainder in separate cells; under no circumstances are two prisoners to be locked up together in one cell.

Classification. 14. Prisoners convicted of felony are never to be locked in the same cell with other prisoners.

Light at night. 15. A light is to be kept burning in the passage of the gaol all night.

Solitary imprisonment. 16. Prisoners sentenced by any court or justice to solitary confinement shall be locked up in separate cells, and not allowed to converse with any other prisoner. They shall only be allowed to leave their respective cells in custody of the gaoler. Their meals are to be taken in their cells, and the window of each cell in which a prisoner is in solitary confinement is to be closed on the outside with the shutter provided for that purpose.

Prison diet. 17. The diet for prisoners is as follows:

A copy of the diet table is to be hung up in the day-room of the gaol.

Prisoners before trial and debtors. 18. Prisoners committed for trial or for debt may purchase provisions for their own use, with the sanction of the gaoler; provided that no spirits shall be allowed to be so purchased, and not more than one pint of beer or wine for each prisoner every day.

19. No prisoners are allowed to smoke in the gaol under any Tobacco circumstances.

20. No spirits shall be conveyed into the gaol for the use of any Spirits. prisoner without the written order of the Colonial Surgeon.

21. No spirits, wine, beer, tobacco, tools, or articles of any kind shall be conveyed into or out of the gaol or to any prisoner without the sanction of the gaoler; and if any person shall convey or attempt to convey or cause to be conveyed anything whatsoever into the gaol or to any prisoner without the sanction of the gaoler, the gaoler shall report the same to the magistrate as soon as possible. Conveying spirits to gaol. (Administration of Justice, Ordinance Clause 57.)

22. The labour to be performed by the prisoners will be directed, from time to time, by the Governor. The gaoler will be always present with the prisoners. The hours will be regulated by the work-bell. Hard labour.

23. The gaoler will report to the magistrate any prisoner who may be guilty of disobedience, idleness, profane swearing, abusive language or conduct, insolence, absence without leave, or other misconduct. Misconduct of prisoners at hard labour.

24. The prisoners will be employed every Saturday afternoon to clean the gaol, wash their clothes, and such other duties as may be ordered. Cleaning gaol.

25. Female prisoners are to be kept apart from male prisoners, not to have their meals in the same room, or to be allowed at any time to be in company of the male prisoners, except during the performance of divine service, and they will be under the exclusive charge of the gaoler's wife. Female prisoners.

26. The gaoler's pay is fixed at 4l. per month, and an allowance at the rate of sixpence a day for every prisoner above three in the gaol. Pay of gaoler.

27. An allowance of sixpence a day is made to the gaoler's wife for every female prisoner in gaol. Allowance for female prisoners.

28. Every cell is to be supplied with a paillasse filled with straw, and a sufficiency of blankets, and is to be kept clean and well aired. Clothing will be supplied for use of the prisoners from time to time, for which application must be made by the gaoler to the Colonial Secretary. Provisions, fuel, and light will be supplied at the government store, on application to the officer in charge of the stores. Supply of bedding, clothing, and provisions.

## Falkland Islands.

Memorandum as to the Construction and state of Government House, and of the furniture therein and of the Arrangements under which it is provided as required by Sir George Grey's Circular dated 9<sup>th</sup> of August 1854.

The Government House as originally designed in 1844. would consist of a centre and two wings. At present the centre and right wing are all that is completed. The House contains a Drawing room 32 ft<sup>6</sup> x 21 ft<sup>6</sup>. A Dining room 19 ft<sup>6</sup> x 19 ft<sup>6</sup>. A Hall 14 ft<sup>6</sup> x 14 ft<sup>6</sup>. A small study 10 ft<sup>6</sup> square, besides 3 bedrooms of the following dimensions viz., 21 ft<sup>6</sup> x 21 ft<sup>6</sup>, 12 ft<sup>6</sup> x 12 ft<sup>6</sup> and 12 ft<sup>6</sup> x 12 ft<sup>6</sup> and likewise three Attics. In a wooden building added to the original plan, are the Kitchen, Scullery, Servants bedroom, and outhouses &c. The whole House is fitted up tolerably comfortable and furnished at the Public Expense.
