The annual rental of these buildings calculated at the rate of house rent in Stanley would be about £260 to £300. The value of the Oral Fuel supplied to the guardroom may be estimated at about £30. a year.

There are no military Posts, Works or buildings belonging to or built at the expense of the Ordnance Department.

There is a Powder Magazine built at the cost of the Colony and under the control of the Colonial Government.
