Exemptions

The following articles are exempt from the payment of duty :-

- Perfumed spirits and cologne water, lemonade, ginger ale, ginger beer, soda water, potash and all other mineral waters,
- Naptha or methylic alcohol in its crude state and not fit for use as a potable spirit or for admixture with a potable spirit,

Tobacco forming an ingredient in sheep wash, or hop powder manufactured in bond in the United Kingdom,

All articles imported or taken out of bond for the use of the Governor of the Colony or for the use of His Majesty's Army and Navy,

The Governor and Military and Naval Messes purchasing any article whatsoever, duty paid, shall be entitled to have the same refunded out of the Public Treasury on the certificate of the Governor or of the Officer in Command of any Military or Naval Department, or of any of His Majesty's Ships of War,

The Consulates in this Colony of any foreign countries in which is accorded or in which hereafter may be accorded to British Consular Officers the privilege of exemption from Customs Duties in respect of official goods imported into such foreign countries by His Majesty's Government for the use of His Majesty's Consulates shall have a like privilege granted to them of exemption from any duties that may be levied in this Colony on goods that may be imported by their respective Governments as bona fide official supplies for the use of such Consulates.

For a wreck taken by the Receiver into his custody 5% of the value thereof, but so that in no case shall the whole amount of percentage so payable exceed Twenty pounds (£20).

In cases where any services are rendered by the Receiver in respect of any ship in danger not being wreck, or in respect of a cargo or other articles belonging thereto, the following fees instead of percentage, that is to say,

If such ship with her cargo equals or exceeds in value Six hundred pounds (£600) the sum of Two pounds (£2) for the first and the sum of One pound (£1) for every subsequent day during which the Receiver is employed on such service, but if such ship is less in value than Six hundred pounds (£600) one moiety of the above-mentioned sum.

Fees payable to Customs Officers

The following fees are payable by shipping and importers into the Government Treasury and may on the warrant of the Governor be refunded to the Officer in respect of whose services the fees were originally paid.

Any merchant, agent, or master of a vessel, asking for or requiring the services of an officer of Customs at any time other than the appointed working hours (see below) and the Collector of Customs having authorised the same, shall be charged and shall pay into the Government Treasury fees at the following rates in respect of each officer employed,

- (a) On weekdays (not being office holidays)
- (1) Between the hour of 6.0 a.m. and the hour appointed for the commencement of duty, and after the appointed hours of duty to 8.0 p.m. one shilling and sixpence for every hour or part of an hour.
 - (2) Between the hours of 8.0 p.m. and 6.0 a.m. two shillings and threepence for every hour or part of an hour, provided that unless the services be continuous with the end or beginning of the hours of routine duty in no case shall the minimum charge be less than for two hours

On Sundays, Christmas Day, and Office holidays

- (3) Between 6.0 a.m. and 8.0 p.m. five shillings for the first two hours or part of two hours, and one shilling and sixpence for every hour or part of an hour thereafter
- (4) Between 8.0 p.m. and 6.0 a.m. seven shillings and sixpence for the first two hours or part of two hours and two shillings and threepence for every hour or part of an hour thereafter

When the services of an Officer extend from one period of time into the other the longer time served in either shall govern the amount of fees to be paid in respect of the officer's overtime for the first two hours or part of two hours.

When the personal services of the Collector of Customs are necessarily required by any merchant, agent, or master of a vessel, out of hours appointed for indoor officers of Customs, double the above rates will be charged.

- (b) For single act of entering or clearing or of entering and at the same time clearing a vessel provided that the officer's services be not otherwise required and charged for under section (a) above, on weekdays, seven shillings and sixpence on Sundays, Christmas Day, and Office Holidays ten shillings

In the case of a whale catcher or whale catchers being entered or cleared together with and at the same time as a whale factory or steamer and belonging to the same company, the inclusive fee for each factory or steamer and catchers shall be at full rate and a half.

 Station, Teal Inlet, Fitzroy,

The fees for subscribers (if non owners of long distance
 lines) and non-subscribers are as follows :-

6d for a call not exceeding 5 minutes in duration,
 or,
 6d for a message not exceeding 30 words.

Non-subscribers in the country who wish to communicate with
 Stanley are required to pay similar fees to those mentioned
 above to the Operator in charge of the station where the
 message is transmitted. In the case of a message sent by to
 a non-subscriber in Stanley an additional fee of 2d is
 charged against the sender for delivery.

Rental of instruments.

To annual subscribers £8 per annum for each instrument.

To subscribers for a period of 3 years, an annual
 subscription of £5.5s. for each instrument.
