Circular No. 120. My Circular Despatch August 26th. Remembrance Day.

The arrangements for the celebration of Remembrance Day Sunday November 10th have now been completed and have been approved by His Majesty the King.

Following are the chief points in a press notice which will be released for broadcasting on the night of October 28th and for publication in the morning papers of October 29th.

Representative detachments of the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, Army, Royal Air Force (including Women's branches of those services) Merchant Navy and Fishing Fleet will march to the Cenotaph and form a hollow Contingents of ex servicemen and women who have served in the armed forces and in the Merchant Navy during the two wars and a representative contingent of members of the former Civil Defence services will also be present.

Shortly before 11 a.m. the King will unveil the new inscription on enotaph. At 11 a.m. 2 minutes' silence will be observed following which the King will place a wreath on the Cenotaph. H.R.H. Princess Elizabeth will also lay a wreath and wreaths will subsequently be laid on behalf of Queen Mary and of His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom and Dominions of India Burma of Colonies and Protectorates and of the Royal Navy, the Army, the Royal Air Force, the Merchant Navy and Fishing Fleet and Civil Defence.

The service which will follow the laying of wreaths will be broadcast and televised by the B.B.C.

Her Majesty the Queen with other ladies of the Royal Family will witness the ceremony from the windows overlooking the Cenotaph.

At all cremonies arranged to mark the celebration day war medals and decorations may appropriately be worn with civilian dress by all ex officers and ex servicemen and women, members of the Nursing Services and other women's services to which they have been awarded, while holders of war medals and decorations of deceased relatives have full permission to wear such medals and decorations on the right breast.

There will also be a special service at Westminster Abbey on Remembrance Day commencing at 10.30 a.m.

With reference to Gazette Notice: "Remembrance Sunday"., a copy of which I have received to-day.

At a recent meeting with the Acting Governor when arrangements were made for the observance of the above Sunday, it was agreed that there should be no Religious Service as such at the War Memorial Cross, but simply prayers lasting about five minutes. It was agreed that the official Remembrance Services should be held in the three Stanley Churches at 10 a.m.and that the ceremonies at the Cross should be in the nature of a combined addition.

The Gazette Notice on the other hand states,

(1) That there will be a short Service Of Prayer at the Cross.

(2) That the Boys' Brigade and children from the Government School will will be assembled.....in readiness.....

The Gazette Notice makes no reference to the Religious Services to be held in the three Churches at 10 a.m.

> 1 have arranged for the Children of the Cathedral Sunday School all of whom attend the Government School, and many of whom are members of the Boys' Brigade - to attend the Cathedral Service at 10.

Will you please give me a written assurance that the arrangements Al made will not in any way prevent this.

Will you please also arrange for some kind of addition or correction to the Gazette Notice which will make it known to the general public that the official Services in the three Stanley Churches will be at 10 a.m.

The only alternative that I can see to this latter is to hold the Official Service at the Cross at 11; but I do not consider that the weather is sufficiently reliable to do this.

The impression at present given to the public is that there will be a grand (11 shot), usual Church Services. a grand (if short) Service at the Cross at 11, taking the place of the

2. His Majesty's Government has consulted representative bodies regarding the inscription on the Conotaph and it is felt that it would meet with general approval if the dates 1939-45 were added to the present inscription which would then read

THE GLORIOUS DEAD

1914-1918 1939-1945

3. His Majesty has been pleased to intimate that he will take part in the ceremony at the Cenetaph on 10th November next which is to be generally in the form observed since 1919. His Majesty will carry out a simple act of unveiling similar to that performed by King George V in 1919.

#### BROADCAST TALK ON REMEMBRANCE DAY 1946

BY

HIS EXCELLENCY A. B. MATHENS, ESG., C.B.E.

I want this afternoon to speak of the collection for Poppy Day, as it used to be called, which is to take place to-morrow. Of course, the collection is really in aid of the Earl Haig Memorial Fund, which was established after the 1914-18 War to help men disabled in that war and their families. And now, after the second conflict, which has left the whole world more shaken and disillusioned than that of a quarter of a century ago, we are told that the need is as great as ever.

This Fund and its objects are well known to all of you. There have been collections in this Colony each year, and the generous gifts that have been received from you all have gone to help those less fortunate than ourselves. But I do want to assure you again that if you give to this worthy object you will be doing something which is genuinely worth while.

At the Cross of Remembrance this morning many of us gathered, quite voluntarily, to keep the two-minutes silence, and to think of those who are no longer with us - our friends, our kindred, our loved ones, In the short inscription on the Cenotaph in Whitehall, past which some Falkland Islands had the privilege to march in the Victory Parade, and which the King again unveiled this morning, they are called "The Clorious Dead." Below that inscription are set, the two dates of the two wars in which they fell. And when we reflect on the events of those two periods we may sometimes feel that we have been remarkably fortunate to be living such normal lives now. I know I do.

And yet one is not sorry for the dead. You remember those verses of Samson, when he had compassed the destination of those earlier Nazis, the Philistines; A. I.

"Northing is here for tears, nothing to wail Or knock the breast, no weakness, no contempt, Dispraise, or blame, nothing but well and fair, And what may quiet us in a death so noble. . ." But there are others for whom we grieve: those men who have suffered disablement and maiming, and who have their lives yet to live. At first all must seem very dark to them. They have to be re-educated, rehabilitated, as the saying is, to face life and live afresh. For if one has lost a limb, or worse, it cannot be easy to face things again and to keep up one's courage and one's hope.

That is one thing that our gifts do. They help the memorial Homes and the devoted doctors and nurses and masseueses to help the men to help themselves; so that they can start again with confidence in themselves, and in their usefulness to society, to do jobs in which they can take a pride and which they know will help others.

I was once a patient at an orthopaedic hospital, where patients with every kind of physical malformation seemed to be treated.

I was sorry for them at first - I was recovering anyway myself - till I realised that this was the very last thing they felt for themselves. The place was radiant, with sunshine, for it was summer: but also with a spirit of happiness and of hope. For they knew they had the best possible care and attention, and they felt they were improving, most of them in body, but all in mind. So that the atmosphere of the place was that of the patients' spirit.

It makes a catch in your throat, and it is the <u>kind</u> of spirit in the Earl Haig Homes, the kind of spirit your gifts are helping to keep alive and diffuse.

And there are the thousands of others who are helped by gifts of money or tools or equipment of some kind, which is not available under the provisions of their Wound Pensions. I know that it is often thought, and often by myself, that the happiness and welfare of these gallant men should not depend on private

generosity, but on provision of the State. But no matter how generous the State is, there is always room for private kindness as well, both for them and for their families when in need.

So let us give generously this year. We are off the besten track: but those who have been in Europe lately will bear me out when I say that we have much to be thankful for. And it is more than ever cheering for those at Home to know, by our gifts, that they are not forgotten by us, so far away in space, but so near at heart.

Your Excellency,

I regret that I find myself obliged to report to Your Excellency on the actions of the Rev. R.G.R.Calvert at the Memorial Service on November 10th.

Though I must admit that I was pained at his upsetting of Col. Woodgate's admirable arrangements and also, not being a member of the Church of England, felt that his choice of hymn and prayers was not exactly suitable, it is not to any personal feeling, but to a graver matter arising from the presence of the Naval Guard that I must call attention.

A recent Admiralty Order, A.F.O.6220/46, states that men are not to be compelled to attend Divine Service.

On the understanding that this was to be an official ceremonial of an undenominational religious nature, I ordered the parading of a Naval Guard. Through the action of the Rev.R.G.R.Calvert this guard was forced to attend a Church of England service - a direct disobedience of Their Lordships' orders.

As the Commanding Officer responsible, I must therefore ask that Your Excellency will cause an explanation of this to be given to me and I would be obliged if I might at the same time be informed what definite steps have been taken to prevent a recurrence of such happenings in the future.

With reference to our recent conversation in which you 12 alluded to <u>letters</u> you had received from the Officer Commanding the 13 Falkland Islands Defence Force and the Naval Officer in Charge.

The following is an extract from the "Church Times" dated November 15, 1946 referring to the Ceremonies at the Cenotaph in Whitehall at 11 a.m. on Remembrance Sunday:

"....The marshalling was superb. Guards, blue jackets, and W.R.N.S. "lined the route outside the Home Office. On the East side the "bands of the Guards were massed behind a row of R.A.F. trumpeters "and a row of white-helmeted buglers of the Royal Marines." Shortly before eleven an ecclesiastical procession emerged from "the front door of the Home Office and took up position on the Eas "side of the Cenotaph. It consisted of a cross-bearer, six Abbey "choir-men in surplice and scarlet cassock, and the boys of the "Chapel Royal, proceeding the Archbishop of Canterbury who was "attended by a Chaplain and a verger in the rear.

"....The two minutes extended into eternity. A gun-shot broke "the silence. The King stepped again to the Cenotaph and laid a "wreath...Princess Elizabeth placed another beside it. The Prime "Minister and Mr Churchill, with other statesmen and the service "chiefs followed suit.

"The massed bands played 'U God our help in ages past'. The "Archbishop of Canterbury prayed, 'that all who here do honour "to the memory of the sacrifice of our brethren may be so filled "with the spirit of their love and fortitude that they may live "only to thy glory...' His voice gained strength as he led the "King and people in the Lord's Prayer and gave them God's "blessing.

" The bugler's sounded Reveille. The King and the Captains "departed...."

The "Illustrated London News" for Nov.16 1946 has good photographs of the above.

Services will be held in all the Churches at 10 a.m. instead of 11 a.m. which will end in time to allow the congregation to attend the Ceremony at the Cross of Sacrifice.

#### BROADCAST BY THE HONOURABLE THE COLONIAL SECRETARY.

November 2nd, 1947.

A year ago I spoke about the collection for Poppy Day, as it used to be called, which this year is to take place on November 8th. I was then speaking as Acting Governor and as such was emphasizing the importance of the collection in aid of the Earl Haig Memorial Fund, with which it is usual in the Colonies for the Head of the Government to be particularly associated.

For the last twenty years the collections here have been organised by the Chaplains, who have done it with great devotion. But this year, there is alady at Government House again: and accordingly Mrs. Clifford and the Red Cross are taking over the organisation of the collection for Poppy Day in Stanley. They hope to beat last years total of £155, and they feel that you would wish to know what is being arranged here.

So I have been asked to speak to you again and tell you what is happening. And I will do my best to do so.

Well, poppies are going to be sold on Saturady, November 8th by the Red Cross, and a Dance at which there will be an auction in aid of the Fund, is going to be held on Friday the 7th of November. I understand that the auction will be an auction of what is known as "white elephants": which means that you can give for sale articles that you don't want and are expected to buy articles which other people don't want. If you find that you don't want them either, you can, of course, keep them until next year when, no doubt, they can be re-sold to the xx original owners!

I also learn that there is to be a mile of pennies laid down under the eagle eye of Captain Duncan Watson. But, I believe, there is what is known in Government jargon as "ample precedent" for not letting the pennies remain on the gound indefinitely, and for picking them up when they get too far out of range of the eagle eye. Anyhow that is Captain

Watson's

Watson's business, and I wish him joy of it. I personally hope that people will commute their pennies for silver. For it will make the task of Dr. Hamilton, Mr. MacWhan, and myself much easier at the end of the day when we count the money. Since the one spends a good part of the week counting trout, and since the other, I imagine, spends part of every Sunday counting the Tabernacle collection, I don't propose personally to do more than supervise their activities. But after some experience as local Treasurer elsewhere I have vivid memories of the melancholy and unpleasant task of counting pennies. Hence my hope that silver will feature on this occasion.

Father Kelly has kindly offered to organise a Whist Drive in aid of the Fund, and details are being published.

Last, but not least, workers in the good cause are being entertained to a standing, or running, lunch by Mrs. Clifford at Government House: so that they can leave as much of their own domestic concerns as they can for the morning with a clear conscience.

Seven months ago it fell to my lot as Governor's Deputy to ask you to subscribe to the Flood Relief Appeal. In the light of the amazing response to that appeal, a response, I believe, considerably more generous, relatively speaking, than that from any other part of the Empire, I will not presume, especially when talking to the Camp, to remind you to be generous. You always are.

Memorial Fund itself. It was established after the 1914-18 war to help men disabled in that war and their families: and, of course, its benefits are as applicable to the Falkland Islands as elsewhere if required. Even now, over a quarter of a century later, the need is as great as ever, in order to repair some of the ravages of this second World War. Since I spoke last year, a number of Falkland Islanders have come back after service on all the Seven Seas and, I imagine, in most of the continents of the world. Most of the rest of us, as luck would have it,

have not seen much of the war and indeed we may be the more likely to feel that we have been remarkably fortunate in our lot. There are men who are helped by this Fund, who have suffered disabling or maiming, and who have their lives still to live. At first all must seem very dark to them. They have to be re-educated, rehabilitated, ad the saying is, to face life and live afresh. For if one has lost a limb, or worse, it cannot be easy to face things again and to keep one's courage and one's hope.

Memorial Homes and the devoted doctors and nurses and masseueses to help the man to help themselves; so that they can start again with confidence in themselves, and in their usefulness to society to do jobs in which they can take a pride and which they know will help others. And there are the thousands of others who are helped by gifts of money or tools or equipment of some kind, which are not available under the provisions of their Wound Pensions. I know that it is often thought, and often by myself, that the happiness and welfare of these gallant men should not depend on private generosity, but on provision by the State. But no matter how generous the State is, there is always room for private kindness as well, both for them and for their families when in need.

When the Lord Mayor of London acknowledged the Falkland Islands gift for the Flood Relief Fund he said that it was not only the gift for which they were grateful, but the thought that lay behind it.

Well, it is just the same as this when we help the Earl Haig Fund next week.

So let us do our best this year. We are off the beaten track: but those who have been in Europe lately all say that we have much to be thankful for, and certainly we have a considerable reputation to be proud of. And, as the Lord Mayor

told us, it is more than ever cheering for those at Home to know, by our gifts, that they are not forgotten by us, their kinsfolk, at the other end of the world.

The attention of Government has been drawn to the impression which appears to have been conveyed in the course of Evensong at the Cathedral on the 2nd of November, 1947, that there would be no religious service at the War Memorial this year owing to objections raised by the Naval Officer-in-Charge.

Any such impression would be entirely false. Arrangements for the celebration of Armistice Day are the responsibility of the Government which decided that this should take the form of a religious service in each of the Churches followed by a simple and entirely nondenominational act of remembrance at the Cross of Sacrifice.

In a purely private capacity I most courteously beg to point out that it appears to me that the Merchant Navy was not represented on Remembrance Day in Stanley.

According to the Announcer of the British Broad-casting Corporation, an Officer by the name of Culbertson represented the Merchant Navy at the Cenotaph, London, the Sunday before last. He was in company with an Admiral, a General and an Air Marshal and laid a wreath immediately after the latter.

At about the same time many radio broadcasts from out neighbouring South American countries mentioned the British Naval Attaché, Military Attaché, Air Attaché and, invariably, a representative of the Merchant Navy- usually a Master of some British merchant vessel in port- at some memorial service.

I can not help feeling that it is only fair that people should not be allowed to forget that the Merchant Navy suffered heavily during the last war- in fact, proportionally more heavily than the Navy, Army or Air Force. One in seven of all the Officers and men of the Merchant Navy were killed: a total of about 35,000. About 12 million tons of British merchant shipping was lost through enemy action during the last war.

lam directed by the Governor to refer to your letter of the 2nd of December, 1947, and to say that the impression which appeared to have been conveyed in the course of Evencong at the Cathedral on the 2nd of Movember, 1947, that there would be no religious service at the Lar Demorial this year owing to objections raised by the Haval officer-in-charge, was brought to the notice of Government officially the following day. On the 5th of Hovember the Chaplain was informed that the Haval officer-in-Charge and others had in fact protested against the character of a "denominational service" given, without notice, to the previous year's ceremony: he was reminded that exception to it had been taken at the time by Government with whom the decision regarding the ceremony lay.

- 2. Further, the suggestion was made to the Chaplain that he might wish to give to the views of Government a publicity similar to that which appeared to have been given in the course of Evensong on the 2nd of Movember to the remarks which had caused the complaint. The Chaplain made no observation other than that, in his opinion, the presence of the Choir did not make the ceremony a denominational service.
- 3. Since no step appeared to have been taken to adopt the suggestion in my preceding paragraph and in view of the representation made to Covernment in the matter, a Public Notice was issued defining the view of Government briefly expressed at the end of the first paragraph of this letter.



Thank you very much for your communication of the 3rd inst., advising me that Mrs.G.M.Clifford, the wife of His Excellency The Governor, has most kindly consented to become the Hon.Lady Organizer of our annual Poppy Day Appeal in the Falkland Islands and that all future correspondence in connection with supplies of roppies etc., may be addressed to you.

We deeply appreciate Mrs.Clifford's sympathetic interest in our Appeal and work, and I would ask you to express to her our grateful thanks for undertaking this work.

I shall be most interested to receive any news you can give me of the 1947 Appeal and perhaps you would let me know whether Mrs. Clifford was able to be responsible for it.

While writing I should welcome any assistance you can give me on the subject of the outstanding 1946 Collection. From our point of view the position is as follows:-

On the 14th February last the Rev.R.G.R.Calvert. as hon.Organizer wrote saying - "The sum of £165.8.0. is being forwarded to you through the Grown Agents for the Colonies. This sum was collected in the Colony for the Earl Haig Fund in 1946." As by the 10th June this money had not come to hand we notified the Grown Agents accordingly who replied stating they had not yet received any authority for such a payment to be made. 
