

On Thursday 15th February, 1951, during the visit of H.H.S. SUMRB to Fort Stanley, the Naval Fuelling Depot was visited by an Engineer Officer. The following deficiencies were observed:-

#### 1. Window Fremes.

The steel window frames in the Boiler House and unp House are unsuitable for the temperature chan ca which occur, and the glass panes break frequently. It is recommended that these window frames should be constructed with teak or a material with a suitable coefficient of expansion, and endurance.

#### 2. Wall Covering.

The interior walls of these two Buildings are covered with plaster-made salt water compant. As the compant dries salt is deposited, and the wind drives this deposit to the interior wall, where it is easily visible and can be removed by hand. This salt has a demaging effect upon the machinery, particularly the moving parts. A small area of the wall has been replactored with PUDLO FLASTIN and on this section there is no sign of any salt deposit. It is recommended that the entire walls should bo plastered with FUDLO MASTER.

3. Oil Fuel Lighter. The Oil Fuel Lighter in use at present has no wheelhouse. The wheel is exposed to the weather and moving parts frequently seize due to exposure. It is recommended that a wheelhouse be built to improve the life of the wheel and its associated machinery

#### 4. Telephone Communications when Oiling.

The barge, which holds approximately 450 tons of Oil Fuel, is itself fuelled at the jetty by gravity supply from the tanks, about 300 yards away. It is recommended that a telephone be installed for the wheelhouse mentioned in 3 above, which when connected to shore or ship would provide better comunication when fuelling.

#### 5. Official action taken.

It is understood that Admiralty authority to proceed with these recommendations has already been sought by the Falkland IslandsCompany the maintain this Naval Fuelling Depot.

It is confirmed that they are all most desirable.

SUBJECT:-I have the honour to report on the F.I.C's offer for the naval Building on the Camber known as the "Slop Shop" as requested by the Secretary of State for the Colonies:-

In company with Lieutenant Commander Arnold of H.M.S. St. Austell Bay, I inspected the building concerned which proved to be timber framed building, externally lined with heavy gauge corrugated galvanized iron, and internally with plywood, & with a timber floor. The whole standing on wooden piles.

The building is 50' x 20' 0.A. Measurements, with a pitched roof, and in a spendid state of preservation, the only signs of deterioration being the disint@gration of a small panel of plywood beneath a window.

The cost of the corrugated galvanized iron at present prices would be  $\pounds 196 - 16 - \Theta$ , allowing for 50% reduction as second-hand material, plus 10% for dismantling & transport, puts its value at not less than  $\pounds 80$ .


It can be seen fron this item alone, that the sum offered  $(155 - 10 - \theta)$  is not exactly reasonable, and my estimation of its minimum value is £250, and Lieutenant Commander Arnold agreed with this figure.

### Report by Officer-in-Charge, Jublic Jorks Department on idealralty Store Shed.

In company with licutement Commander Arnold of M.M.S. St. Austell Bay, I inspected the building concerned which proved to be a timber framed building, externally lined with heavy gauge corrugated galvanized iron, and internally with plywood, and with a timber floor. The whole standing on wooden piles.

The building is  $50^{\circ} \times 20^{\circ}$  C. A. measurements, with a pitched roof, and in a splendid state of preservation, the only signs of deterioration being the disintegration of a small panel of phywood beneath a window.

The cost of the corrugated galvanized iron at present prices would be A196. 16. Oc., allowing for 50, reduction as accond-hand material, plus 10, for dimentling and transport, puts its value at not less than A30.

It can be seen from this item alone, that the sum offered (2155. 10. 0d) is not exactly reasonable, and my estimation of its minimum value in 2250, and Lieutenent Commander Arnold agreed with this figure.

2. I will continue to press the Admiralty for a reply but I am none too sanguine as to receiving an early will. It appears to me that the Admiralty have been hold a advised mean in the same been hold a second mean in the same back. meyand to would early really. It appears to me that the Admiralty has been badly advised regarding the sale of this hut as the other buildings at the Camber are not watertight, and are, by Admiralty instructions, being allowed to dulapidate and are therefore not suitable stowages for perishable articles.

Since, however, I have no information whatever 3. a he amagand. of events leading to the sale beyond that given by you to Lieutenant Commander BAIRD, I am pressing only for approval in principle to hire transport to and from the W/T station or to hire storage space from the Falkland Island Company, both of which will, of course, cost the Admiralty money. I wish if possible to avoid the alternative of re-embarking the articles now stored in the hut, as storage space onboard is very limited owing to the additional equipment needed to keep a ship self-supporting in the Falkland Islands.

> The whole problem is not, therefore, so simple 4. as it might first appear, and the period of one week which you mention is short under the circumstances.

Payment was made via Crown Agents in March and transaction closed but I had no occasion to take actual possession until 2nd September when chrounstances demanded that I obtain immediate possession and contractor was ready to dismantle and move the building. As however local Admiralty agents (Falkland Islands Company who had made earlier inferior bid quoted in your Savingram 108 of 27th May, 1952) and Captain of visiting frigate had not been advised of transaction they have referred matter to C. in C./A.W.I. from whom no reply has yet been received. As I have immediate need of this building which Administration bought in good faith and has paid for and this shilly-shallying is causing me considerable inconvenience grateful if Admiralty be requested give instructions for its release forthwith.

> 2. I suspect that attempt being made persuade Admiralty rescind sale on grounds building required for essential stores, argument which I am not repeat not prepared accept as they have two larger buildings alongside which will serve their purpose equally well.


