Sir,

With reference to conversations regarding the Admiralty Rifle Range Land held under Colonial Government Grant dated 27th May, 1904., I shall be glad if you will inform me as to whether, in the event of the Admiralty being willing to dispose of the land in question, the Colonial Government would desire to be considered as a possible purchaser.

The land included under the above mentioned grant consists of lots Nos: 27 to 39 inclusive and was purchased in the first instance for the Admiralty by the Colonial Government from Messrs The Falkland Islands Co; the cost, £1000., being met by Naval Funds. It is at present leased to the Falkland Islands Co: on 21 years lease as from 27th May, 1904.
