Now that we have finally cleared Portsmouth and are heading south for Gibraltar I feel it would be of value to put on paper a few points concerning our first visit to Stanley which may need advanced thought or action. A list of our more detailed requirements is included as an appendix to this letter.

- 2. We leave Santos on 18th November and have a few hydrographic tasks on passage after which I aim to arrive Stanley at 0830 on Wednesday, 27th November. There will doubtless be many things to arrange by signal and I therefore propose that Communications are established between H.M.S. PROTECTOR and Stanley W/T on 19th November.
- 3. If it is convenient to you I suggest that I pay my Official call on you at 1000 on 27th November, arriving by helicopter. I imagine that there will be plenty of ground to cover and would therefore propose 1130 as a suitable time for your return call. Assuming that you would like to fly, as discussed in Portsmouth, a helicopter would lift you at 1125.
- 4. I believe that the most satisfactory ceremonial arrangement in the past was for the ship to fire your personal salute while you hove off the ship and the Guard will be drawn up on the Quarterdeck for inspection after landing. If you approve I would like to follow the same procedure this time. I hope that you will have time to visit the Wardroom and meet the new Officers before departure.
- 5. H.M.S. PROTECTOR's Cocktail Party, as discussed will be on Friday, 29th November, at 1830. I am forwarding invitation cards which I should be grateful if your Staff could pass on to those concerned. We are working off last years list so perhaps they could remove cards for people who no longer exist and we have included a few blank cards in case there are any new arrivals who you consider should obviously invited.
- 6. We carried out a Disaster Relief exercise in Portland which proved that we need changes in organisation and more practice. If you have no objections I should like to repeat the exercise in Stanley on A.M. Friday 29th November. This would be on a strictly non interference basis to people and property ashore in some area to be mutually agreed, which has a few buildings and a suitable jetty.

- As you know we are always looking for opportunities for landing the Royal Marine Detachment and - more difficult to give them opportunity for field firing. I intend to land the detachment P.M. Wednesday 27th November to set up camp ashore for two nights in order to prepare for their disembarkations further South. It would greatly enhance the value of the exercise if they could set up a firing range for use during Thursday 28th November. I understand that the Murrel Bridge area might be the most suitable location for this and I should be grateful if you could give favourable consideration to the operating of a firing range in this, or any other suitable area. We should of course, take stringent precautions to see that the area was properly cordonned off, marked and patrolled during any actual firing.
- 8. I have been asked by Maval Works Department to re-staytube a Cochrane type boiler held at present in the oil fuel depot Port Stanley. In order to carry this out I intend to land a party comprising one Engine Room Artificer C.P.O., one Mechanician P.O., and one M(E) from 30th November until completion of the work. If no unforeseen difficulties develop the anticipated time for completion is approx. 45 working days. It would be appreciated if accommodation could be provided (full board) from 30th November 24th December, and from 31st December 20th January. With this party I will be landing a diesel air compressor and associated tools. I would also be grateful if the Falkland Island Company could provide us with workshop facilities (i.e. grinding and sharpening chisels).
- 9. I shall be glad to place a helicopter at your disposal for a fishing expedition at any time other than A.M. Friday 29th.
- 10. The ship will be inviting a limited number of guests to the usual Sunday cinema performances. We do not propose to send out invitations in advance of arrival but I hope that I may use this letter to extend an invitation to yourself and Lady Arrowsmith to dine with me on that night and stay for the film.
- 11. Admiral Talbot, the Commander-in-Chief, South Atlantic and South America, has confirmed that his visit to the Falklands is still planned for 8th 10th February, 1964, and has asked me to discuss the programme with you.



#### H.M.S. "PROTECTOR" - MAILS.

Dear Sir.

With reference to the recent carriage of airmail in "Darwin" for H.W.S. "Protector" on voyage H.1. the circumstances of shipment are as follows.

Mails were being received by Mr.P.Thain,
2nd Officer, at 1000 hrs, Monday, 27th January.
On seeing the airmail Mr.Thain asked the Uruguayan
postal official in charge of the mail if mail for
"Protector" was included. The official replied
that it was not. Then, to impress upon him that
no mail for "Protector" should be shipped,
Mr.Thain informed the official that "Protector"
was expected to arrive in Montevideo the following
morning. The official replied that he was fully
aware of this fact. Thereafter seals were examined
and the mail tallied into the ship. In accordance
with normal procedure no examination was made of
labels.

Regarding the Waybill the only examination of this was to ascertain the total number of bags, whereupon a running tally was made into the ship. Practically all Waybills produced in Uruguay are indecipherable as regards details, and it is quite normal procedure to look for total number of bags only. Reference to this was made in the final paragraph of my letter to Mr.M.G.Creece, Acting Colonial Manager, dated 18th June, 1963.

Previously "Protector" mail has been handled by the British Embassy in Montevideo. This is the first season in which "Protector" mails have been delivered to "Darwin" by the Uruguayan Post Office.

It is greatly regretted that "Protector's" mail has been over-carried, but, in view of the 2nd Officer's remarks to the Uruguayan postal official, I feel no blame can be attached to the ship.

I have the honour to report that Her Majesty's Ship
"Frotector", under the command of Captain Martin S. Ollivant,
M.B.E., D.S.C., paid a further informal visit to Montevideo
from the 28th of January to the 4th of February, 1964, being
joined on the 2nd of February by the Commander-in-Chief,
South Atlantic and South America Station, Vice-Admiral A.A.F.
Talbot, E.B.C., C.B., D.S.C., who sailed in her after paying
his first official visit to Uruguay. My non-resident Maval
Attaché, Captain P.A.I. Bailey, was present, and of great
assistance to me.

The infrequency of air connections between Cape Town and Montevideo (via Dakar) obliged Admiral Talbot to arrive at aid-day on a Friday, at an hour when Urugusyan officialdom is well on its way to the beaches for the weekend. He was not therefore able to pay his official calls until the following Monday. In the absence through sickness of the current President of the National Council of Government, Senor Daniel Fernandez Crespo, he was Pecsived by National Councillor Luis Giannattacio, who is due to take over the Presidency on March 1 and to be in office in October when - if all goes well - Admiral Talbot is to pay a welcome return visit. The joint visits also provided good opportunities

further to coment our close and informal relations with the Uruguayan Navy and with their newly appointed Inspector-General (Mear Admirel Edro Torres Negreira) and his Chief of Staff. They for their part were characteristically of Staff. They for their part were characteristically generous in putting a twin-engined navel aircraft at the generous in putting a twin-engined navel aircraft at the generous in-Chief's disposal over the weekend, and in laying on a variety of other facilities.

3. It is hardly necessary to expatiate on the extensive hospitality dispensed to and by H.M.S. "Protector", whose annual appearance from the Antarctic has assumed the character of a secular fiests. Two novel features however deserve comment. Firstly, the presence on board (from Christmastime until the ship's arrival in Montevideo) of two Uruguayan naval officers, Lieutenant Carlos ("Sam") Costa and Midshipman Eduardo Nosei - a project to which the Admiralty had kindly given their consent (Br. Parsons' letter A15218 of November 7, 1963). Apart from the excellent relations established between these two good-humoured youngsters and their British colleagues in the ward Reom, this trip (as we had hoped) opened up a source of responsible first-hand evidence for the Uruguayans that the Falkland Islanders (whatever may be said in certain Argentine circles, and in que course no doubt in the United Nations) are not an isolated pocket of would-be Latin-Americana groaning under an Anglo-Saxon colonialist yoke. I am grateful to the Governor of the Falkland Islanda for arranging hospitality for these two Uruguayan officers in and around Port Stanley over Christasstime.

4. Ceconaly, mention should be made of a late addition to the official programme, in the shape of an extremely effective talk given by Captain Ollivant to the Urugusyan-British Lunch talk given by Captain Ollivant to the Urugusyan-British Lunch Club in Contevideo on the work done by H.S.C. "Protector" in

the interctic, stressing interpolis the fact that all the results of this pri-sh eccentific enterprise are made available to the other signatories of the interctic Treaty. The two Uraguayan officers will also have been enabled to tear ditness to this other positive aspect of the British contribution towards developing this Press-neglected continent; and Lieutenant Costa (in the intervals between learning perseveringly to ski) took colour files of the ship's work which it is hoped to show on Bruguayan television.

- 5. I am grateful to lasiral Telbot and Captain Ollivent, and to the Officers and Ship's Company of Hele. Protector', for their contribution to this successful Urugusyan-British occasion including their stoicies in the face of various shortcowings (on the part of the happy-go-lucky Urugusyan postal and port outhorities) which sust have proved a sore trial to the local Excy with its standards or split-second efficiency.
- 6. I am sending copies of this despatch (without its enclosures) to the Covarnor of the Calkiand Islands, to the Covarnor-in-Chief, Jouth Atlantic and South America Station and to my Neval Atlantic in Suenos Aires; and I enclose a spare copy which you may wish to pass to the Colonial. If it

### REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS - ANTARCTIC SEASON 1963/64.

1. I have the honour to submit a report of the proceedings covering H.M.S. PROTECTOR's minth season in Antarctic waters between December, 1963 and 2nd April, 1964. Details of the ship's activities are given in my signalled SITREPS numbers 1 to 5 copies of which are forwarded as enclosure 1.

#### GENERAL.

- 2. 1963/64 has been a bad ice year. The presence of large belts of pack ice around the coasts of Grahamland and the South Orkney and South Shetland Islands dominated the seasons operations by holding up the relief of bases and rendering inaccessible areas in which it was planned to work. All pre planned programmes had to be recast and the continuing effort of resupplying bases has been at the expense of scientific and survey work.
- 3. Apart from pack, there has been a great deal of ice about which embarrassed the ship in high winds and sea states or bad visibility owing to the ship's unmanoeuvrability. This also restricted the amount of sounding which could be safely carried out.
- 4. It is both fruitless and dangerous to attempt to fight the elements in Antarctic waters. Conditions change so rapidly, however, that much can be achieved by maintaining a flexible programme close to the desired areas of work and seizing every chance to return to the charge whenever opportunity offers. This policy, coupled with rendering assistance to the British Antarctic Survey by redisposing vital stores and personnel, left virtually no spare time for tasks such as visiting foreign bases. In the event only the Chilean Base at Discovery Bay and the British bases at Deception and Argentine Islands, the latter by helicopter only, were visited when operations took the ship there.

#### OPERATIONS.

- 5. The seasons work was covered in four patrols which can be triefly summarised as follows:-
  - (a) Patrol One. December, 1963. Owing to extensive pack ice barring access to Antarctica and the fatal accident on the first day of the Seismic programme with R.R.S. Shackleton, activities were confined to the Falkland Islands.
  - (b) Patrol Two. January, 1964. Ice cleared sufficiently for the ship to reach the GERLACHE and BJSMARK Straits, for hydrographic work, but no further. B.A.S. were assisted by delivering aircraft stores to R.R.S. John Biscoe off Adedaide Island and the survey party was established in Discovery Bay. Two Uruguayan Officers were embarked for this patrol.
  - (c) Montevideo. The usual halfterm storing visit to Montevideo followed Patrol Two. A report of this visit is included at Enclosure 2.

- (d) Patrol Three. February, 1964. Flying your Flag the ship visited Port Stanley, Admiralty Bay for your meeting with Sir Vivian Fuchs, and Discovery Bay to re embark the survey party. Once again vital B.A.S. stores were collected from Deception Island and delivered to R.R.S. John Biscoe in the pack off Adelaide Island. After dropping the survey party at Port Lockroy the ship proceeded to PUNTA ARENAS, via the Beagle Channel and your Flag was hauled down after a brief but successful visit.
- (c) Patrol Four. March/April, 1964. After visits to Port Stanley and South Georgia the remainder of March was spent in a joint R.N./B.A.S. survey of the South Sandwich Islands. After a brief visit to BOUVET Island, PROTECTOR arrived at Simonstown on 7th April.

#### SOUTH SANDWICH PROJECT.

- 6. The South Sandwich project was the major operation of the season and its undoubted success more than made up for the frustrations caused by the bad conditions met in other areas. The project had been planned in considerable detail before leaving the United Kingdom and the effort put into logistic planning paid handsome dividends.
- 7. Until peristent fog set in over the final week we were unusually fortunate with the weather. Visibility was rarely good but the absence of pack ice and strong gales allowed operations of one sort or another to continue on every day.
- 8. Anchoring was only once possible but the ship was able to drift for all but three of the nights. This was fortunate for with eleven hours of darkness and negligible lee it would not have been safe to steam amongst the numerous growlers in heavy seas and the ship would have been forced to leave the area.
- 9. The work both ashore and afloat was photographed by Mr. C. LEGUS, of the B.B.C. It is anticipated that the result will be a television documentary film in the "Adventure" series which should appear in the autumn and will, I hope, provide some good publicity for the Royal Navy and the British Antarctic Survey.
- 10. Detailed reports of the results of this project will take some months to prepare. Suffice it to say that the most important tasks were completed in 10 out of the 11 Islands of the group.
- 11. The project covering the investigation of many aspects of each island, required careful planning for each day's operations. The method employed of getting all parties together each evening and discussing conflicting requirements and priorities worked wall. The scientific party and the Naval survey learnt each other's problems and also those of the ship and the ship's flight. The overall results auger well for the Icebreaker which should be frequently engaged on combined B.A.S./R.N. operations.

### SOUTH GEORGIA.

- 12. Two Japanese firms leased the whaling facilities at Grytviken and Leith in South Georgia this year. They worked in conjunction with the Japanese whaling fleets. I was shown round the SALVESON's installation at Leith, which was being efficiently run by the NIPPON SUISAN KAISHA Company (NSK). They had started the season with 6 catchers and 2 buoyboats but 4 of the former were sent off to join the Factory ship early in the season. They were operating the station as a trial with 160 men, as opposed to Salveson's normal complement of 400, and reckoned that they had had a reasonable successfully season bearing in mind the shortage of men and catchers
- 13. I was interested to discover that the main objective was meat rather than oil. About half of a whale can be used for meat and this they chopped into small blocks and loaded into refrigerator ships which sail straight for Japan to feed the teaming millions. The remains are boiled into oil in the usual way and exported to Europe. The firm working from Grytviken had also had a successful Elephant Seal season.

- 14. The Japanese were obviously keen to please. I still carry with me the vision of all those teeth looking upwards as I came in to land by helicopter on the football field. I discussed their work with the small team left behind by Salvesons and the British Seal inspector. It was evident that they work hard forlittle pay and because of this the pilot scheme seemed to have proved economically successful. They are expected to take the lease for another year.
- 15. The fuelling installation was inspected by my Engineer Officer and found to be in good order. The 500 tons Admiralty stocks of FFO was a comforting cache to have up one's sleeve lest anything had gone wrong with the WAVE KNIGHT which fuelled PROTECTOR off the South Sandwich Islands. However, this is unlikely to be repeated for some years and it would seem sensible to use this cache next season since the ship will spend some days off South Georgia in connection with the Joint Services Expedition.

### SURVEY PARTY.

- 16. The ship's survey completed useful surveys of the EAGLE Passage, Falkland Islands and DISCOVERY BAY, Greenwich Island. After repeated unsuccessful attempts to reach the ARGENTINE Islands, where the main task lay, PROTECTOR disembarked them at Port LOCKROY, some 32 miles from their destination on 18th February. They finally reached the base under their own steam in their surveying boat NIMROD on 24th February.
- 17. R.R.S. Shackleton onward lifted their heavy gear from Port Lockroy in early March and R.R.S. John Biscoe arrived to perform her annual task of mother ship on 10th March. With her able assistance the Geodetic survey across the Bismark Strait, which had been started by PROTECTOR in January, was completed. By 5th April, when NIMROD had to be withdrawn in the face of new ice formation, half the survey of the inshore southern approach to the Argentine Islands had been completed.
- 18. It says much for the resolute and energetic leadership of Lieutenant Commander J.B. DIXON, Royal Navy, that so much was achieved in the face of every conceivable difficulty.

### SHIP'S FLIGHT.

- 19. A report of the activities of the Ship's Helicopter Flight is attaheed as Enclosure 3. The Flight has been ably led by Lieutenant J.J. LEESON, Royal Navy, and has achieved much under difficult conditions.
- 20. The Whirlwind Mk. 1 Helicopters have once again proved reliable, rugged and in many ways ideal for the task. However, their low margin of power has been a constant problem and has, on occasions, proved dangerous when unexpected conditions of turbulence and down draught have been met. I am sure that something could, and should be done about this, and will be making proposals to the Flag Officer Naval Air Command.

### ANTARCTIC TREATY.

- 21. Although there was little opportunity to appraise the progress of international cooperation under the Antarctic Treaty there has been no cause to suppose that its operation has been unsatisfactory. Once again the Chilean base at Discovery Bay were most friendly and very helpful to the ship's survey party. The Russian geologist, on exchange with B.A.S., who took passage for a few days in PROTECTOR provided a good example of the kind of scientific cooperation which is now possible.
- 22. In January, PROTECTOR met the U.S. Coastguard Icebreaker EAST WIND who was carrying the American inspection team under Article VII of the Treaty. There was no opportunity to meet this team, nor did they evince any interest in visiting PROTECTOR since they were concerned with bases rather than ships. As far as is known the inspection of the British bases was brief and amicably conducted.

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23. There have been indications that the Argentinians are taking a more militant interest in their so called Antarctic territories since the recent change of Government. There was no opportunity to confirm this however. The Argentinian and Chilean effort in Antarctica is still largely carried out by military personnel and there remains a clear case for British interests continuing to be supported by the Royal Navy.

#### PROTECTOR REPLACEMENT.

- 24. The need for a British Icebreaker was amply demonstrated this season. Both Royal Research Ships SHACKLETON and JOHN BISCOE were severely hampered by ice and the relief of bases was badly held up. Indeed, the southern bases were only relieved with a few weeks to spare before the end of the season. Had they not been, both the winter activities and next season's work would have been severely jeopardised. If the southerly trend of the Survey's activities is to continue, then a British Icebreaker is essential.
- 25. Quite apart from the relief of bases, PROTECTOR's limitation as an Ice Patrol Ship were fully exposed by the bad ice conditions this year. The ship is unwieldy and becomes virtually unmanoeuvrable at slow speeds in a high wind. The extra ½ inch plating on the waterline provides minmal protection and she is very vunerable to damage below the belt from heavy growlers which are difficult to see except at very close range in high sea states. The ship was frequently unable to proceed within helicopter range of her objectives and I regard it as extremely fortunate that no ice damage was suffered throughout the season.

#### MATERIAL.

26. The material state of the ship remains good with the exception of the auxiliary machinery which has given endless trouble. This matter has been fully represented and measures to improve the situation are in hand for the forthcoming refit.

### PERSONNEL.

- 27. The fatal accident caused by a demolition explosion on the net deck in early becember was a setback which shook the morale of the Ship's Company considerably at the time. They recovered quickly, however, and have remained remarkably cheerful and willing despite many weeks at sea without much sight of the sun.
- 28. Much has been done to aleviate boredom onboard but I believe that a major factor in keeping the Ship's Company contented has been the excellent relations with the people of PORT STANLEY. Local families have taken an unusually large number of sailors into their homes and given them friendship and a bed for the night. The atmosphere ashore made Port Stanley very much of a home port.

#### CONCLUSIONS.

- 29. Despite an abortive start and extremely unfavourable conditions for most of the time a considerable amount of useful work has been achieved during the season.
- 30. I believe that the successful South Sandwich operations have shown the potential of closely integrated Hydrographic/Scientific surveys under the White Ensign. The Icebreaker, which is designed to cope with just such work shall greatly increase the scope of the British effort in the Antarctic.

### SITREP NO. 1. (All dates December.)

- 1. Heavy pack North of South Shetlands and Orkneys caused revision of plans. My 302214Z refers. Sailed Stanley 1st after landing Royal Marines for training ashore. Landed Survey Party and one helicopter Speedwell Island 2nd for survey Eagle Passage area. Visited Beauchene Island with Falklands naturalist. Returned Stanley 3rd.
- 2. Sailed Stanley 4th. Shackleton in company. Sounding and seismic trials en route. Commenced seismic operation in position 52 45 South 47 30 West 6th After accidental explosion on deck, two killed one seriously wounded seismic abandoned. Shackleton proceeded Signy. Proceeded Stanley arriving 8th to land wounded and for funeral.
- 3. Sailed Stanley 11th to support survey party thence to Punta Arenas for Board of Inquiry arriving 14th. Sailed 17th on completion carrying out sounding en route arriving Falklands 19th to support survey party. Visited Port San Carlos 21st to 23rd. Arrived Stanley with Governor embarked 24th.
- 4. Survey Party Progressing well. Helicopter of great advantage and doubles output. Both remaining Speedwell until ship collects on way South 1st  $J_an$ .
- 5. Royal marines made good use of three week period under canvas including much patrol training and some live firings. One section of Falkland Island Defence Force spent three days with detachment for training.
- 6. John Biscoe and Shackleton initially delayed by pack now back to programme. Main tasks completed are supply of repair parts for damaged Otter aircraft at Deception and landing components for new hut at Signy.
- 7. Argentinians also hampered by ice have partially relieved Matienzo and Belgrano bases in Weddel Sea from Ice Breaker San Martin. Chilean expedition delayed sailing but Filoto Pardo will be South early in New Year. Japanese firms established successfully in South Georgia having satisfary sealing and whaling season.

### SITEP NO. 2. (All times January).

Sailed Stanley 1st with two Uraguayan naval observers onboard collected surveying partys Speedwell which had completed excellent months work from thence to Dransfied Strait east of South Shetland to avoid pack. No pack encountered but numerous bergs and small in south of 60 degrees.

- 2. Arrived Deception Island 4th visited base repaired lighthouse and transferred one seismic scientist to Shackleton, sailed 3 hours after arrival.
- 3. Entered Gerlach Strait 5th thence via Nemmayer Channel into Bismark Strait. Heavy pack prevented rendezvous with John Biscoe at Arthur Harbour. Progressed Trig work 5th and 6th in good weather. B.A.S. Aircraft finally able to move south 6th from Deception to Adelnide ready to supply southern bases.
- 4. Advance of pack precluded further work Bismark Strait and passage Lemaire Channel to Argentine Islands so base there visited by helicopters.
- 5. Retired northwards up Gerlache 7th landed R.M.s and exped. party of 6 plus Uruguayan's Cierva Cove. Safe camp and excellent ski slope. 8th ship sounding work north Gerlache. 9th fixed shoals and rocks off Trinity Island by airborne hydrodist. Ship skiing party landed Cierva Cove and penguins embarked for Zoo.
- 6. Surveyed Austin Rocks and re-positioned in Bransfield 10th. 11th complied with urgent B.A.S. request to collect vital aircraft spare from Deception for Adelaide Island. Transferred spare to Biscoe sheltering 4 miles inside pack just north of Antarctic Circle 12th.
- 7. Returned Gerlache 14th and met U.S. Icebreaker "Eastwind" with 3 inspection team embarked (British Embassy Washington's letter No. 1521/63 dated 10th August, 1963) in Bismark Strait. "Eastwind" agreed to assist passage to Argentine Island which inspection team visiting following day. Trig work continued with helicopters.
- 8. Entered medium pack astern "Eastwind" p.m.15th. 9 hours and 1,495 engine and wheel orders including 10 full asterns later withdrew to Gerlache having proved conclusively PROTECTOR not cut out for Antarctic pack even with own private icebreaker. No known damage sustained except to nervous system.
- 9. Recovered Ras and Exped 16th Excellent skiing training achieved.

### SITREP NO. 2 (cont.)

- 10. P.N. 16th arrived Discovery Bay South Shetlands 2 Chilean ships in bay but sailed later. No contact made due to thick fog. Established survey party ashore 17th and friendly relations with Chilean Base. Arrived Stanley a.m. 20th.
- 11. "Biscoe" in Argentine area at start thence south as aircraft safety ship but heavy pack has prevented her reaching Adelaide Island to date. "Shackleton" miscellaneous tasks Bransfield and Georgia and is bringing Sir V. Fuchs south. Chartered "Kista Dan" is on way annual relief Halley Bay base.
- 12. Chileans have relieved Discovery Bay and Deception although chief vessel "Picoto Pardo" had to return Punta Arenas with engine trouble.
- 13. "Eastwind" inspection teat will probably visit more bases and their survey party are investigating Arthur Harbour which is earnarked as U.S. base.

### SITREP NO. 3 (All dates February)

- 1. Sailed Stanley 11th. Arrived Admiralty Bay p.m. 13th for r/v "Shackleton". Sir V. Fuchs discussed B.A.S. supply problems onboard. Assistance arranged. Sailed same evening.
- 2. Arrived Discovery Bay a.m.14th in pleasant weather embarked survey party who had completed survey of bay. C-in-C, S.A.S.A. visited Chilean base and exchanged calls with Commodore Chilean Antarctic task force who was present. Sailed early p.m. arrived Deception later to embark B.A.S. stores and personnel base visited and members entertained sailed at dusk.
- 3. Passage south aided by helicopter reces. all day 15th off west coast Grahamland. Fine weather broke into full gale with driving snow just before contencement transfer to "John Biscoe" of stores and personnel. However seizing opportunities enabled all vital stores and personnel to be flown onto ice floe alongside which "John Biscoe" lay. Swell outside pack too great for boats.
- 4. Personnel transferred were 2 doctors for research programmes south and Russian geologist on exchange research programme. Stores were large quantity aircraft parts to keep B.A.S. Beaver aircraft at Adelaide flying They should ensure aircraft can return Deception for wintering which had seemed doubtful.
- 5. Passage north and via Gerlache to Port Lockroy where violent gale prevented landing survey party p.m. 17th. Ship dragged  $1\frac{1}{2}$  cables during night but winds dropped early a.m. and enabled operation to be completed. Ice clearance has since enabled survey party to reach Argentine Islands.
- 6. Arrived Port Williams south end of Boagle Channel p.m. 20th embarked Ambassador to Chile. Sailed dawn 21st for passage Beagle Channel. Lovely scenery enjoyed. Arrived Puntas Arenas a.m. 22nd.
- 7. "John Biscoe" still vainly trying to enter Marguerite Bay for supply southern bases. Certain successes using dog teams from accessible parts of Adelaide have been achieved. "Shackleton" holding fort at northern end of area with Fuchs visiting bases. Base at Hope Bay closed down. "Kista Dan "relieved Halley Bay.
- 8. Chileans continue satisfactory relief of their bases which are not far enough south to be cut off by ice. Argentinians not seen except "San Martin" carrying V.I.P. party on tour of inspection Admiralty Message 171632Z refers.

SITREP NO. 4 (All dates March)

- 1. British Antarctic Survey and Naval Hydrographic investigation of South Sandwich Islands. Sailed Stanley 29th February arrived South Georgia 3rd. Inspected fuelling arrangements Leith and found in good order, also whaling station. Japanese had satisfactory trial year with limited resources. Consider likely they will opt to return with bigger team next season. Embarked scientists and stores for investigation and sailed Grytviken 4th.
- 2. Arrived South Sandwich group 5th. Landed survey and scientific parties Leskov. No ice cap island warm underfoot in places. 6th landed 3 scientists, communication and R.M. support party Candlemas for 17 days. No site suitable for tidal readings. Recce. Saunders and landed geologist onway south. Again unsuitable tide pole so abandoned this project.
- 3. Recce. Montagu and Bristol 7th geologist landed. Found Freezeland Rock only possible Bristol survey point.
- 4. Covered South Thule group 8th to 11th scientists and survey parties camped Bellingshausen 2 nights. Despite bad weather group well covered. Achieved hydrodist range Bellingshausen Freezeland 11th.
- 5. Leapfrogged north 12th to 16th fixing islands with hydrodist and angles and landing scientists. Good weather 14th to 16th allowed completion traverse to Vindication and Candlemas and good scientific coverage Vindication. Hydrodist distance of 90 kilometres and shaky aerodist of 70 kilometres achieved.
- 6. Completed Candlemas survey and link north to Visokoi 17th and 18th. Fog stopped play 19th and 20th but ship confirmed no significant change 15 fathom shoal MW Zavodovski.
- 7. Replenishment astern "Tave Knight" 21st. Taking 970 tons in 5 hours. Understand she may be laid up if so regard last replenishment midst icebergs and fog a fitting climax to distinguished R.F.A. career.

### SITREP NO. 5 (Bouvet Island)

- 1. Arrived p.m. 30th March. Inhospitable island shrouded in low cloud. High winds causing severeturbulence and treacherous flying conditions. Collected mail from R.S.A. who had spent 2 ineffective days lying off awaiting weather improvement.
- 2. 31st March. Temporary lull enabled scientific party landing on new west coast lava bed first reported 1958 and now proved caused by recent eruption. Maided flight R.S.A. helicopter delivered South African meteorologist onboard. Rapid 90 degree shift in 15 knot wind resulted in shore party and helicopter being marooned ashore for 2 hours in 50 knot turbulonce.
  - 3. Hove to in Force 9 gale throughout April Fools Day.
- 4. Weather moderated 2nd April sufficiently to mount combined operation with both ships helicopters to western lava plateau for met station recce. and consolidation scientific work. Unidentified and relatively undamaged 20 foot ships boat found in pool 100 yards inland from beach. Report being forwarded.
- 5. Low Cloud and high winds prevented hydr graphic work ashore except for temporary break in which some sun observations taken. Ship sounded throughout period to delineate island bank.

### VISIT TO MONTEVIDEO - 28TH JANUARY - 4TH FEBRUARY, 1964.

- 1. The half-term visit to nontevideo was successful from all points of view. The ship was able to embark the usual large quantity of much needed stores, relations with the Uruguayan people and Navy were cemented and the Ship's Company found the relaxation to which they had been looking forward.
- 2. The ship had a good press which was enhanced by the interest shown in the two Uruguayan  $N_2$ val Officers who arrived with the ship, having joined at Christmas and completed one Antarctic patrol. This was a successful venture which could well be repeated from time to time.
- 3. Calls and formality on arrival were restricted in view of your extensive calling programme on 3rd February.
- 4. 48 hours leave was given to each watch and the camp at LAGUNA del SAUCE was again organised and was well patronised.
- 5. I attended a lunch in the British Uruguayan Club after which I gave a short talk on PROTECTOR's work in the Antarctic.
- 6. Your Flag was hoisted on 2nd February and the ship sailed for Port Stanley on 4th February, 1964.

- 1. I have the honour to submit the following report of proceedings of the Ship's Flight for the 1963 64 commission.
- 2. The Flight recommissioned at the R.N. Air Station, Lee-on-Solent on 5th June, 1963. After an initial set-back caused by aircraft unserviceability the work up for the 1963 64 season got off to a good start in early July. The visit to R.N. Air Station, Culdrose for night flying was marred by clutch trouble culminating in a forced landing and clutch change on Wonwell Beach in Devon. After this the work up continued well, 106 hours having been flown by the time the Operational Readiness Inspection was carried out by the Flag Officer Maval Flying Training on 2nd October, 1963.
- 3. Embarkation in H.M.S. PROTECTOR was completed on the 8th October and the Flight remained embarked until 2nd December when a detachment of one aircraft, two aircrew and four groundcrew was established ashore on Speedwell Island (Falkland Islands) in support of the Ship's Hydrographic Survey Party.
- 4. The operation on Speedwell Island which lasted for 28 days and during which 54 hours were flown by one aircraft, is believed to be the first of its kind involving hydrographic survey work, and was considered by all to have been an outstanding success. The use of the helicopter for the many and varied tasks of surveying, notably the establishing and marking of the 'trig' points and sounding marks, enabled about four times as much work to be carried out as would have been possible by more conventional means. It was also during this period that the hirborne Hydrodist was first put to operational use. The detached flight re-embarked on New Year's Day and both aircraft have remained with the ship for the remainder of the season.
- 5. Operational flying in the Antarctic has been carried out around the Grahamland Peninsula, the island of South Geoargia, the South Sandwich Islands, Bouvet Island and Tristan da Cunha in a wide variety of weather conditions, mostly umpleasant. The flying task has fallen into the following main categories: Ice Reconnaissance, Hydrographic Survey, Scientific Survey and Reconnaissance, Photographic Survey and Airlift of personnel, stores and equipment, for all of which the current aircraft, though not ideal; are well suited. Useful payload continues to be the main problem and it was rather a shock to find the Hiller 12E operating from the R.S.A. at Tristan da Cunha lifting the same payload as the Thirlwinds. However, the internal carrying capacity of the Whirlwind, particularly as far as volume is concerned, has many advantages and it is feared that the lack of this capability in the MASP, destined for the proposed Icebreaker, will prove a distinct disadvantage. The question of payload and associated problems is the subject of a separate letter to the Flag Officer Naval Air Command.
- 6. Of particular interest within the Hydrographic Survey task is the Airborne Hydrodist, mentioned earlier. This is the use of Tellurometer equipment installed in the helicopter to measure ranges to and from otherwise inaccessible points. It was especially useful in the Gerlache Straits area where several small navigational hazards, including rocks awash, were fixed by this method.
- 7. In the Airlift tasks it is worth recording that the Nansen sledge carriers, manufactured during the work up by Fleetlands, proved a great improvement on the previous method of carriage on the few occasions that they were required.

### SECTION II - FLYING AND OPENATIONAL.

1. Operational flying from the ship has revealed no serious deficiencies in training or work up preparation. Although there are several ways by which efficiency and readiness might be improved and maintained:-

#### (a) Advanced Flying Practice.

In the light of this season's experience, great value would be gained by a week's operation in a suitable 'mountain flying' are during the work up. It is thought that the Royal Air Force have such an area somewhere in Wales, and it is suggested that the Flight make use of it towards the end of the work up period.

The Army Air Corps Centre at Middle Wallop, Hampshire, last year allowed the Flight to use their low flying area for confined area and rough ground work. This was most valuable and should be a regular feature of the work up.

### (b) Continuation General Flying Practice.

General handling techniques become very rusty during operational flying in the Antarctic and a 'half term' session of G.F.P., as was carried out at Port Stanley in February this year is considered essential to continued efficiency and safety.

### (c) Instrument Flying.

It is impracticable for pilots to keep in I/F practice whilst embarked. This, together with operating temperatures always around freezing, precludes safe cloud flying. However, the ability to use correctly the blind flying instruments increases the efficiency and safety marginal conditions so often encountered when 'ground contact' flying can still take place and therefore justifies the Work Up IF Syllabus and continuation training during early stages of commission.

### (d) Royal Marine Training.

The Officer Commanding Royal Marines agrees that the work up training of the Royal Marine Detachment should not be overlooked. Unserviceability and other commitments curtailed their training last year and this showed up during the early combined operations. Three full days are recommended for this training in future.

### (e) Control of Deck Operations.

A simple system of traffic lights would greatly facilitate the control of lounching and recovery of aircraft. The following systems are suggested:—

### (i) Deck Clear/Deck Foul Lights.

A GREEN and RED light displayed near the flag deck bridge door and operated from the flight deck.

### (ii) Take off/Landing Control Lights.

A GREEN and RED light displayed in the 'OPS TENT' and operated (by the Captain) from a switch adjacent to the Dock Clear/Dock Foul lights.

### SECTION III - TECHNICAL.

- 1. No major maintenance or servicing difficulties have been encountered during the season, but the radio troubles with XA 866 which delayed its delivery persisted for some time.
- 2. A number of minor changes and improvements are desirable before next commission:-
  - (a) A freight release unit capable of lifting more than 500 lbs.
  - (b) An electrical freight release switch located on the cyclic control. All releasing has been done by foot (emergency) release as it is impossible to remove the left hand from the throttle and collective to operate the release button.
  - (c) The wheelbrakes have not performed as well as they should.
  - (d) The engine starter motors have given trouble throughout the season.
  - (e) The standard pattern wheel-chocks are of no use with the emergency flotation gear fitted. They were replaced early in the year with locally manufactured chocks of a more satisfactory design which have given good service.
- 3. All these items will be taken up with the appropriate departments during the work up period.
- 4. The UHF PTR 170 Production Model has been installed in XA 868 throughout the season. A separate report has been made as requested by the Flag Officer Naval Air Command and this will be forwarded at the next opportunity.

### SECTION IV - AIR STORES.

- 1. Several minor difficulties with aircraft spares revealed an unsatisfactory situation in the Air Stores organisation. The main troubles discovered were:-
  - (a) A large stock of 'life expired' items which should have been returned during previous refits.
  - (b) Stocks of perishable items without a shelf life, which have been in the ship for many years.

- (c) Aircraft spares of a wrong type for the Mk. 1 Whirlwind and others which are not up to the required modification standard.
- 2. A thorough investigation has been made into the difficulties experienced.
- 3. The cause appears to have been primarily a lack of liaison between the Flight and the Air Stores during previous commissions and during the refit periods. However, a contributory factor is a lack of understanding and knowledge of air stores usage and control on the part of successive stores ratings.
- 4. It is intended to take the following action to correct the present situation and to prevent a recurrence:-
  - (a) The Flight Stores Officer will take a close interest in all Air Stores matters and will liaise, through the Senior Maintenance Rating, with the Air Stores Rating to ensure that all stocks are correct and up to date. It is intended, on the next commission, to detail a Flight Petty Officer to assist the Flight Stores Officer in this respect.
  - (b) To attempt to arrange for the Air Stores ratings to visit a Naval Air Station for a short time so that he can gain some first hand knowledge of Air Stores usage and control.

### SECTION V - MISCELLANEOUS.

- 1. It is hoped to acquire a larger number of immersion suits for the use of 'occasional' passengers, and the S.E.S.O., will be visiting the S.E.S.T.S., to discuss troubles encountered with the electrical wiring in the heated suits.
- 2. It has been noted with some concern that the Flight Deck Fire Marty sometimes consists of young M (E)'s with no specific training in fighting aircraft fires. Mext years team will be completing a course at the School of Aircraft Mandling at Culdrose and it is felt that they should be replaced by untrained ratings only if absolutely essential. In view of the expected contract refit it is now hoped to send a further two M (E)'s on the firefighting course.





# INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE FALKLAND ISLANDS AND DEPENDENCIES ICE PATROL SHIP, H.M.S. PROTECTOR - 1964/65 SEASON (Short Title - I.P.A. 5)

References: A. The Antarctic Treaty.

- B. Admiralty letter M.II/351/1/60 of 21st July, 1961 (with which was enclosed Foreign Office INTEL. No. 85 of 5th July, 1961).
- C. South Atlantic General Orders.

#### INFORMATION

Information concerning the United Kingdom's policy and intentions for the 1964 - 65 Antarctic Season, together with the latest information regarding the intentions of foreign powers in the area and the disposition of foreign ships in the Antarctic, will be promulgated by the Ministry of Defence (Navy) (Director of Naval Intelligence) in due course.

2. In the following instructions reference is made to the "Treaty Area" and to the Falkland Islands and Dependencies. The Treaty Area, within which falls the "British Antarctic Territory", is the area below latitude 60° South. The British Antarctic Territory is the area bounded by the lines 60° South, 20° West and 80° West. The Falkland Islands and Dependencies consist of the Falkland Islands, the South Sandwich Islands and South Georgia (all North of 60° South). The Governor of the Falkland Islands and Dependencies is also the High Commissioner for the British Antarctic Territory.

#### INSTRUCTIONS

#### Tasks

- 3. Subject to other commitments allowing, you should endeavour to obtain such information as is required by the Hydrographer of the Navy. No Royal Navy Survey Ship will be operating in the area during the season.
- 4. The Antarctic Treaty (Command Paper 1535) entered into force on 23rd June, 1961, and its provisions are to be carefully observed. In particular, your attention is drawn to Article 1 of the Treaty, as a result of which the area South of latitude 60° South is to be used for peaceful purposes only and also to Article 7, paragraph 5, which provides for advance notice to be given of all expeditions and bases in the Treaty Area and of the introduction of Military personnel and equipment. In the Treaty Area you are to act under the general

direction of the High Commissioner for the British Antarctic Territory. You are to afford him all possible assistance in furthering international co-operation in the area and, when practicable, to give help to the British Antarctic Survey. As the Antarctic Treaty is now in force, information on bases, expeditions and ships in the Treaty Area will be exchanged by the signatory powers. If, however, you notice any unusual activity in British possessions South of latitude 60° South (either by one of the signatory powers un-notified or in contravention of the Antarctic Treaty or any activity of a non-signatory power), you are to investigate discreetly and to report full details both to me and to the High Commissioner for the British Antarctic Territory. In addition, you are to take advantage of any opportunities to visit the bases of other signatory powers.

5. In the area North of 60° South you are to afford His Excellency the Governor of the Falkland Islands any necessary assistance in maintaining the security of the territories under his jurisdiction. If you are in the neighbourhood of the South Sandwich Islands, you are to report to His Excellency the Governor any signs of activity in this group and afford him any assistance he may require in delivering protests to foreign bases or ships.

#### Protests

6. As regards the Treaty Area, attention is drawn to Article 7 of the Antarctic Treaty, particularly paragraph 3. As regards the area North of 60° South, if any occasion for protests arises, you are to report the matter to His Excellency the Governor of the Falkland Islands and act on his instructions keeping me informed at all times. He will provide you with information concerning the procedures for the preparation and delivery of any protests to foreign bases established in British possessions. When drafting protests in connection with foreign warships, you are to bear in mind that the complaint is against un-notified visits of foreign warships to British Territories and not to their passage through territorial waters, to which (provided it is innocent) there is no objection in international law.

#### Safety of the Ship

- 7. Great caution is required in navigating Antarctic waters which are extremely ill-charted and in which there is often a danger of ships becoming damaged or beset by ice. Special vigilance is required when in bays where a shift of wind may bring a sudden change in ice conditions.
- 8. You should be guided by ice and weather reports, as well as by earlier precedent, as to whether or not it is prudent to proceed to certain areas. This decision rests entirely with you. You must, however, bear in mind the serious consequences should your ship suffer damage in such waters. Subject to the above precautions there is no limitation upon your movements and your decisions, made in the light of these instructions, will have my full support.

### Royal Marines Detachment

9. The disposition of the Royal Marines Detachment during the season is subject to the requirements of the moment and, unless ordered by the Ministry of Defence (Navy), ranks are not to be left ashore in the

Dependencies without my prior approval. If at any place within the Treaty Area, an opportunity occurs for training which is consistent with Article 1 of the Treaty, you are to inform the High Commissioner for the British Antarctic Territory and myself, and you are not to land the Detachment until you have the agreement of both authorities. If permission to land the detachment in the Treaty Area is granted, you are to observe carefully any instructions the High Commissioner for the British Antarctic Territory may give. If the opportunity presents itself when you are North of latitude 60° South, you are authorised to land the Detachment without awaiting my approval and to inform me of the fact. H.M.S. PROTECTOR is, in such circumstances, to remain in the area until all personnel have been recovered.

- 10. In making proposals for the disposition of this force, you should be guided by the advice and requirements of His Excellency the Governor.
- 11. Attention is particularly invited to Article 1, paragraph 1, of the Antarctic Treaty, which forbids the carrying out of military manoeuvres and the testing of any type of weapon.


#### ACTION IN SUPPORT OF CIVIL POWER OR OTHER EMERGENCY

- 12. In circumstances in which you are acting in support of Civil Power, you are to be guided in the use of force by the requirements of His Excellency the Governor or his representative.
- 13. If you are operating alone, your actions are to be based on the following rules:-
  - (a) With the entry into force of the Antarctic Treaty and the increased spirit of co-operation which it has engendered, it is unlikely that any hostile act will take place. However, should such an act be committed against H.M. Ships under your command, or against any other British ship, or against British personnel, you are authorised to retaliate with the use of force and to inform me and the Governor of the Falkland Islands immediately. The force used is to be the minimum necessary to counter the particular hostile act committed and is to be directed only against the particular unit or units of the foreign power concerned.
  - (b) If a situation arises, other than the above, in which you consider that force may be necessary, you are to obtain the directions of His Excellency the Governor, and are to use force only if so authorised by him.
  - (c) In any use of force, the circumstances are to be reported by EMERGENCY signal to the Commander-in-Chief, South Atlantic and South America Station, INFO MOD (NAVY).

#### ADMINISTRATIVE ARRANGEMENTS

14. You are to signal to the Commander-in-Chief, South Atlantic and South America Station, INFO MOD (NAVY), your intended movements and any deviations therefrom. My prior approval is to be sought before you visit any foreign territory.

/15 ....



- 15. As a routine matter you are to keep me informed, briefly, by signal, INFO MOD (NAVY), about once a fortnight, of the situation in the Falkland Islands and Dependencies and British Antarctic Territory and of your own activities. Items of news value should, if security permits and His Excellency the Governor agrees, be signalled direct to the Chief of Naval Information, INFO the Director of Naval Intelligence and the Commander-in-Chief, South Atlantic and South America.
- 16. In addition, a Report of Proceedings is to be rendered to the Commander-in-Chief, South Atlantic and South America Station on completion of the Antarctic season. This should not be a detailed chronological diary of the ship's movements, but should summarise briefly the ship's operations in the Antarctic and include any recommendations and proposals for the future. A copy of the Report is to be sent direct to His Excellency the Governor of the Falkland Islands. This Report should be separate to the reports on your passage to and from the Falkland Islands at the beginning and end of your duties. The latter are to be rendered in accordance with South Atlantic General Order 1303.

#### Visit to South America

17. Arrangements will be made for one recreational and informal visit to Montevideo during the season.

#### Security

18. Routine movements connected with the relief or support of the British Antarctic Survey bases are to be treated as RESTRICTED. Movements made, or projected, in connection with action against foreign intruders are to be classified SECRET.

#### Communications

- 19. Watch is to be maintained in accordance with Admiralty Fleet Order S3/64. Table A, Line 6, and on local nets as necessary.
- 20. To enable Cape Naval Radio to establish communications when broadcast SA is non-continuous, loudspeaker watch is to be maintained on Area 2 Schedule A outside SA periods. Area 2 Schedule A frequencies are listed in Admiralty List of Radio Signals, Volume 1. Components in use for each schedule are amended quarterly.
- 21. Fixed Service 104 is available on request, for use between H.M.S. PROTECTOR and Cape Naval Radio, if difficulties are experienced on Broadcast SA and/or ship-shore.
- 22. Details of the Antarctic One Time Pad Net are given in Admiralty letter M.II/SD. 6146/60 of 28th September, 1960. H.M.S. PROTECTOR also holds SA One Time Pad Net No. 3.





SUBJECT :- P.M.G. Approved Air Radio Frequencies.

The Post Master General has authorised the use of the four frequencies in the H.F. air radio bands, to date only three have actually been used, manely 3440, 4675 and 5580 Kc/s.

- 2. The frequency currently in use is 5580 Kc/s. but because of bad reception conditions it is occasionally necessary to change channels to maintain communications, in which case 4675 Kc/s. is then used.
- 3. It would therforenot be strictly correct to state that we have discontinued to use any of the authorised frequencies, although 5580 Kc/s is the frequency mainly in use.

Sir,

Thave the honour to report that Her Majesty's Ship "Protector", Commanding Officer Captein Martin S. Ollivant, M.B.R., D.C.C., Royal Mavy, paid her unnual "balf-term" visit to Montevideo from the 2nd to the 9th of February before returning once more to her ice patrol duties.

- 2. A copy of the final programs is enclosed. The normal courteey calls were exchanged and the friendlineas of the Gruguayan Navy towards the Foyal Havy was as sarked as ever. The newspaper coverage was excellent and in addition to the local English language newspaper an Gruguayan daily referred to the visit of "our ship". This phrase helps to illustrate that the ship and those who serve in her are part of the local scene, and that a periodic remnion is expected and welcome.
- 3. Owing to the absence of the Moyal Marine platoon on garrison duty in the Talkland Inlands, the usual greath laying coresony was emitted from the programms so as not to draw undue attention to their absence. However this omission will be made good when M.M.S. "Protector" calls here informally from the 12th to the 15th of March to pick up assumition, provisions and a newly assigned platoon of Boyal Marines from the United Kingdom.
- 4. There was unfortunately one mishep abourd Her Majosty's Ship "Protector" when her two Whirlwind helicopters were

/demaged

The Right Honourable Sichael Stewart, etc. etc.

In addition a rating and a junior absented themselves from Her Majesty's Ship "Protector". Having obtained funds from Sritain, and assured of a ready velocut on the beaches at the height of the tourist assured they are, I fear, unlikely to reappear until the ship's return in March. It is to be hoped that subsequent events will be such as to deter their shipmates from taking this as a precedent.

5. I am sending copies of this despetch (without enclosure) to the Sovernor of the Falkland Islands, to the Commander-in-Chief, South Atlantic and South America Station, and to my Naval Attaché in Busnon Aires. I also enclose an extra copy which you may wish to pass to the Colonial Office.
