Following our conversations in reference to Colours for the Defence Force: - I submit herewith a letter from The Rev. Dean Lumsdale.

I beg to recommend that we accept the offer made by the Dean.

I have looked over Kings Regulations carefully and in regard to Colours there in nothing to mide us as to that the Colours should be.

I agree that your suggestion of a white ground with coat of arms in the centre, and other decoration outside to ay mind would be suitable, but I think for other det ils it would be advisable to refer the matter to Home Office.

If His Excellency first approves it will then be necessary to obtain Kings permission signified through the Army Council.

Sir,

I have the honour to state that the Very Reverend H. E. Lunsdale, Dean of Stanley, has offered to present the Falkland Islands Defence Force with a regimental Colour. The Defence Force does not possess a regimental colour and, unless there is any objection on the score of principle, I think that the offer is to be accepted with due appreciation.

2. I would ask, therefore, with your concurrence that the War Office may be approached with the view to obtaining such sanction as is necessary. At the same time I should be grateful to receive full instructions for the proper preparation of the colour, including particulars as to its design and size, and the materials to be used.

3. I would add that as a design there has been suggested the arms of the Colony worked in green and gold on a white ground.
