Your Excellency,

I have the honour to refer to an incident relating to Your Excellency's return to the Colony, which I consider of such a serious nature as to warrant the immediate closing down of the Falkland Islands Defence Force.

I received orders to provide a Guard of Honour for Your Excellency and forthwith detailed Captain O'Sullivan to act as Officer i/c Gward and to choose his men preferably from Government Departments in order to avoid any difficulties which might arise from selecting men from commercial firms. Captain O'Sullivan informed me on the 2nd of November that he had obtained eighteen volunteers for the Guard of Honour and three men to man the saluting gun. All arrangements were then made and the men informed of the time and place for the parade.

On 13th of November at 1800 hours Captain M O'Sullivan informed me that with the exception of seven men the Guard of Honour had refused to parade on the 14th as they stated some of them had signed the petition. Captain O'Sullivan then informed that he had done everything he could but these men still refused to attend the parade.

On his suggestion a meeting of all Active Members of the Force was called at 1930 hours on the 13th of November to ask for volunteers for the Parade. Nineteen men attended the meeting but only the seven who already volunteered again stated they would parade. On my instructions Captain O'Sullivan cancelled the Guard of Honour and I informed the Officer Administering the Government of my action.

I wish also to point out, Your Excellency, that I consider the Defence Force, by virtue of its organisation, an undisciplined and quite useless military Force. In my opinion the Defence Force should have been modelled on the lines of the Territorial Army at home, its discipline and regulations being brought into line with the Army Act and King's Regulations. Under the existing Ordinances the Force is less disciplined than a troop of Boy Scouts.

In view of the above I strongly recommend the closing down of the Defence $\mbox{\it F}$ orce and all its social amemities.

I also wish to tender my resignation as Commanding Officer of the Defence Force as I would sooner have nothing to do with a military organisation over which so little control and discipline can be exercised.

Sir,

With reference to resignation and retirement of Defence Force Officers through members refusing to form a Guard of Honour on the return of His Excellency Sir Geoffrey Miles Clifford, I personally disagree with the adoption of the above attitude.

After careful consideration I maintain that the above attitude if seriously adopted and entire disembodement of the Force is carried out, it would mean that we were unable to cope with a breach of discipline, & in the minds of the Public, & members of the Force, our only way out of the difficulty was to resign, or retire. I strongly object to thes form of policy, for if one retires, or resigns, he is leaving himself open to a form of criticism that would be very detrimental to the future discipline of the Force. We should not give way, but make plans to prevent an occurrence of this nature in the future.

When an incident of this nature presents itself, it is up to all Officers to deal with it effectively, and to impress upon the offenders what discipline really means and to leave them in no doubt whatsoever as to the consequences, if a breach of discipline of this nature should ever

occure again.

There are Officers who have taken a very keen interest in the training, and social entertainment of the Force, and what they stand to loos whether through resigning, retiring, or the disembodement of the Force, needs no further explanation. Then there are the old retired members, who, through no fault of theirs, stand to loose what they strove so hardto build up, "The Honour of the Force" The Honours gained by them at Bisley on so many occassions, both individually and collectively.

we must not think for one moment that by resigning, retiring, or the disembodement, can preserve the Honour of the Force, because it wan't, and is only a sign of weakness. The Honour of the Force so far has not been lost, only darkened, and it rests entirely with us whether it remains like that or not. If we pull together and discipline is restored and maintained, we will then have achieved something to be proud of, and there will be no need to shudder. Alternatively we resign, or retire, and the Force is finally dissolved, we should as Officers be ashamed of ourselves to think that the fate of the Force rested entirely with us.

I therefore suggest that another Officers meeting should be

called to reconsider the somewhat rash decision made.

6. Falkland Islands Defence Force. His Excellency informed Honourable Members that the Commanding Officer of the Defence Force had reported that members of a Guard of Honour who had previously volunteered to parade on the occasion of His Excellency's return to the Colony, had at the last moment declined to parade, and despite a further broadcast appeal, only six details could be obtained, and the Guard had therefore to be cancelled.

Following upon this the Commanding Officer and the Officers of the Defence Force (with one exception) had tendered their resignations in protest. His Excellency went on to say that under no circumstances was he prepared to overlook such a gross insult to him as His Majesty's representative, and proposed, with the concurrence of Honourable Members and subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, to suspend the activities of the Defence Force together with all its associated amenities until such time as the names of the ringleaders have been disclosed and/or full and formal contrition has been expressed. His Excellency also proposed to announce his decision at a special parade of the Defence Force in the near future, and to refer to it in his address at the forthcoming meeting of the Legislative Council.

Honourable Members unanimously concurred in the action

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which His Excellency proposed to take.

From GOVERNOR to SECRETARY OF STATE.

No. 298. SECRET. On 2nd November Officer Commanding Defence Force called for volunteers to furnish Guard of Honour of 21 details on occasion of my return to Colony. Volunteers obtained without difficulty and selected mainly from Government personnel to avoid disturbances other interests. On 13th November thirteen of these volunteers declined to parade having in interval been suborned from their loyalty and obedience. Guard had therefore to be cancelled.

2. Commanding Officer and all Officers Force excepting one recently commissioned (who favours exhortation) have tendered

resignation in protest.

3. Since Force without Officers is as useless as Force without discipline I intend in my capacity as Commander-in-Chief to suspend its activities and also associated amenities (latter under Rule 7 of Defence Force Club Rules see Gazette of 1st December, 1945) until such time as names of ringleaders have been disclosed and/or full and formal contrition has been expressed. Force has completed winter training and its efficiency will not therefore be affected. Commanding Officer reports that Force has no proper discipline that there is no means of enforcing it and that judged by any military criterion it is quite valueless. It is clear that constitution of Force will have to be amended in any case possible to make it more like the Territorial Army in England, in order to strengthen powers of the Officers and enforcement of discipline.

4. While I have thusfar remained silent in face of continued abuse and subversive activity of Hardy clique this recent affair represents gross insult to me as His Majesty's representative which I am in no circumstances prepared to overlook. I propose with the full support of my Executive Council to announce my decision at a special parade of the Force as soon as I am fit enough to attend it and shall refer to decision at forthcoming session of Legislative Council, i.e. on 29th November. I therefore request your very early

concurrence in action which I propose.

INNEDIATE. No. 203. SECRET. Your telegram No. 298.

It is difficult for me to comment usefully on a matter thm of this nature which is essentially one for your discretion. It does not seem to me, however, on the evidence before me that there has been any breach of any provision of the Defence Force Ordinance 1920, unless it can be shown that failure to attend the parade after originally volunteering was such an act as for example deliberate conspiracy by members concerned which might thus make them liable for the offence of committing an act prejudicial to good order and military discipline. Unless that were so, disciplinary action under the Ordinance or action such as you propose taking would appear drastic and might aggravate the whole issue. The real cause of the trouble seems to be the original instigators of this affair who, unless they are also members of the unit, would not be affected by the action which you propose.

- 9. So far as I can judge this is a matter which would normally be dealt with inside the unit, and an alternative way to settle it might be through the Commanding Officer. I note the latter's opinion about the discipline of the Force and that he has tendered his resignation. Normally speaking, however, the Commanding Officer would be responsible for discipline and morale of the force and for dealing with a situation such as this.
- 3. I recognize that this incident represented a personal affront to yourself which I deeply deplore and I sympathise with your feelings. However it is a grave matter to bring into public discussion questions affecting the dignity of the Grown and I am not convinced on the information before me that it might not be better for you as His Majesty's representative to avoid becoming involved in controversy over the incident. I feel sure that you will weigh this carefully before taking any action.
- 4. There may well be a need for an overhaul of the constitution and organization of the Defence Force, and I shall be interested to receive your proposals in due course.

There can be no doubt that refusal of certain individuals furnish guard after having volunteered and been detailed constitutes act prejudicial good order military discipline. Though volunteers these men have taken Oath Allegiance and wear King's uniform. confers no repeat no disciplinary powers on Officers who have been consistently handicapped. They believe that Karl Lellman (who with Hardy and Jones has been actively engaged in formenting trouble here) was responsible for this disfection; person named is a Reservist and was responsible for opposing Government's plans to increase efficiency and strength of Force last year. Officers hoped that action I proposed would lead recalcitrant members to expose this individual as I have taken great interest in Force but I appreciate views expressed in your paragraph 3 and will take no personal part.

I remain of the opinion that seriousness of incident and state of indiscipline which it reveals leaves me no choice in accepting or at least holding in abeyance resignations very properly tendered by Officers and suspending activities and associated amenities Force until such time as amende has been made and or proposals for remodelling of Force have I can in any case do nothing until Commanding Officer been considered. I must refer now to certain matters which although they are outside the scope of this debate are nevertheless of public interest and importance; on these I have hitherto remained silent but I intend to be so no longer. doubtless well-known an Hon. Member of this House has thought fit to identify himself with a communication to the Secretary of State decrying the new Constitution; to thuse condemn the new Constitution, which marks a substantial advance upon the old, before it has been given a fair trial cannot be regarded as responsible criticism and . is little calculated to encourage, much less to accellerate, the further advance which you - or should I say some of you? - would wish to see.

That same Honourable Member in association with a paid employee of the Town Council has thought fit, also, to conduct a scurrilous personal attack upon me, and upon my wife, through the columns of a notoriously anti-British journal. The Honourable Member and his friends pride themselves, no doubt, on theor British origins but they would do well to remember that two of the outstanding virtues of the British character are chivalry and a sense of fair play and both of these are conspicuously absent In England the purpose of this from their conduct. manoeuvre was clearly apprehended and it was treated by an enlightened Press with disdain; what effect it may journal in question have had on the readers of the content myself with ansoning there know nor care and will content myself with referring you to an old English adage waich reminds us that it is an ill bird that fouls its own nest.

I will turn now to a more recent and more shameful incident. On the 2nd Movember volunteers were called for from the Defence Force, and readily obtained, to mount a Guard of Honour on the occasion of my return to the Colony. On the eve of my return, when it was too late to make other arrnagements, certain of the men declined to parade and it appeared to the Commanding Officer and other senior officers that these men had been got at in the interval. How members of the Defence Force although volunteer soldiers, have taken an Oath of Allegiance and any person who suborns a soldier even a voluntear any person who suborns a soldier, even a volunteer soldier, from his loyalty and obedience is committing to say the least of it a grave anti-social offence; while any soldier who permits himself to be suborned or who of his ofwn volition commits an act of gross indiscipline on purely political grounds is unfit to wear the King's uniform. The mounting of a Guard of Honour is not a compliment paid to the Governor in his own person and this lamentable incident does not, as it was intended to dobesmirch me but besmirches the good name of the Defence Force - a good name which has been built up over many years by some of the best citizens of Stanley. There can have been few more disgraceful episodes in Colonial There can history and I sympathise deeply with those to whom the good name and reputation of the Force have meant and still mean so much. The Commanding Officer and Officers. with only one exception and that not on political grounds, at once and very properly tendered thier resignations which I have accepted and hold in abeyance. It will be clear to you, Honourable Members, that a Force without Officers is as useless as a Force without discipline and in my capacity as Commander-in-Chief I have sus pended its activities and associated ameneties until such time as wiser counsels may prevail and a full and formal apology has been tendered through the Commanding Officer.

It is evident to me, and to my advisers and others, that the Honourable Member and his associates have dedicated themselves to the unworthy purpose of breeding and maintaining ill-will between the Governor and the people and although I deplore this misdirected energy at a time when there is so great a need for mutual understanding and good will I can only leave them to their ignoble task in the belief that the general public will no longer be deluded.

Let me say this in conclusion. I did not come here to court popularity and I have nothing but contempt for those who do. I cambhere to do my duty, without fear or favour to this Colony and its people; to promoté, as far as in me lay, the properity of the one and the welfare and wellbeing of the other. That duty I have done; that duty I shall continue to do regardless of these mischievous and subversive activities.

In conclusion Mr. Hardy mentioned that he had been "probing" the question of the recent refusal of the Defence Force to provide a Guard of Honour and that he believed that an explanation was available. His Excellency said that he would be very ready to hear any representations or explanations which might be submitted to him through the proper channels, i.e., through the Commanding Officer.

Y. E. (via Col:Butler)

We discussed the matter of the refusal to provide a guard of honour on your return from leave in the light of the recent information which has come to light, and Y. E. sgreed to my suggestion that we might make the opening of the new Town Hall a test case. Col: Butler to call a merting of the whole force, active, reserve and retired, and but the issue to them squarely. I submit at back cover a draft for him to use when outting it to the meeting. · 2. Also at cover is a list of all active members of the force. giving a total of 9156 I have purposely put the number asked for for the guard high, for the reason that I think we should try and force some at least of those who refused before - and I am convinced in my own mind that some at least refused from motives of personal spite - to turn out this time and thus give the lie to their former actions. Provided we can have the opening on a Saturday afternoon, which I imagine can be arranged, I do not see why that number should not turn out if it is really true that the failure to do so on the former

it is really true that the failure to do so on the former occasion was due to mismanagement and not to malignancy. At the same time I would recommend that Col:Butler be allowed some discretion as to numbers should it become apparent to him during the course of the meeting that the number for which we are asting genuinaly cannot be found. Say discretion up to a reduction of 10. (Not as in Genesis, MVIII, 25-32).

Copy of Commanding Officer's Speech

On the eve of the Governors return to the Colony I was told by the Adjutant that certain members of the Force having declined to parade and others offering inacceptable excuses, it would not be possible to furnish the Guard of Honour which is normally mounted on such occasions. I duly informed the Governor and together with other officers tendered my resignation. Apart from its local affect, this incident was reported by the Stanley correspondent of a London paper thereby exposing the Governor, who is our Commander in Chief and who has taken considerable interest in the Force, to a widespread affront.

With only one officer remaining, His Excellency had no option but to suspend the activities of the Force for the time being but on my recent return from the Dependencies he informed me that a member of the REME Retired List wished to place further facts before me and that so far as His Excellency himself was concerned he would be only too happy to be able to regard the incident as closed.

Upon investigation I am satisfied that the facts were not entirely as stated, that there may have been some measure of misunderstanding and consquently perhaps of misinterpretation.

I must in passing express my astonishment that representations by other members of the force were not made to me at the time, or to Major Aldridge in my absence.

In order to avoid any possible recurance of such an embarrassment to the Force, I have recommended that the regulation prescribing compulsory parades should be amended to empower the Commanding Officer to order ceremonial parades not exceeding four in number in any one year for I am sure it is the wish of all of us that such a situation should never arise again.

Lastly, in order to dispel any doubt which may remain I understand that there is to be a formal opening of the new Town Hall next month, or possibly in May, and I intend to ask you for a Guard of Honour of forty on that occasion.

Pierce-Butler addressed the members regarding an incident
which had led to the proffered resignations of himself and
other Officers of the Force and to the temporary suspension
of its activities which His Excellency was anxious to restore
if possible.

The response to Lieut. -Colonel Pierce-Butler's statement was overwhelming agreement to provide a Guard of Honour at least 40 strong on the occasion of the opening of the new Town Hall.

This information has been conveyed to His Excellency who has therefore been pleased to give instructions that the suspension of the Force should be lifted and that all its activities should be resumed forthwith.

I have the honour to refer to the recent incident involving the failure to provide a Guard of Honour for Your Excellency by the Defence Force.

I was informed by the Adjutant, Capt. D.O'Sullivan at the time that on 2nd November he had detailed the Guard on receipt of orders from me but that on the evening of 13th November, which was the day prior to the Guard being required, three members had refused to parade, three others had offered inacceptable excuses for not parading and three members had reported sick and would therefore be unable to parade. He also informed me that at a meeting of the active members on the evening of 13th November all those present had refused to turn out for the Guard.

I reported these facts to Your Excellency and in view of the serious nature of the incident I recommended that drastic action should be taken to prevent a recurrence of such a situation. At the same time together with other officers I tendered my resignation from the Force.

On further investigation, after my return from the Dependnecies, into this situation I interrogated the three men who were alleged to have volunteered and then refused to parade. They informed me that they had only been approached by Captain O'Sullivan late on the evening of 13 th November and as it was a voluntary parade they had stated they did not wish to volunteer. It then became apparent that Captain O'Sullivan had not tried seriously to obtain the Guard until the evening of the 13th November and that although on the 2nd November and again on the 8th November he had assured me that the Guard was complete. These facts I also placed before Your Excellency and in view of them you authorised the recommencing of the activities of the Force.

I feel however that in view of the serious results which have been caused by Captain O'Sullivan action he should cease to be Adjutant of the Force, I have already reprimanded him for his action and informed him that I should make this recommendation to Your Excellency. At the time he stated that if he ceased to be Adjutant he would tender his resignation from the Force but I understand that he has since approached Major Aldridge and stated that he will not do this and that he wishes to place further facts before Your Excellency, these have not so far been forthcomming but I have received the letter at 30 from him this morning.

I have the honour to refer to your Secret despatch No. 1 of the 31st of January, and earlier correspondence, and to inform you that, after my return from the Antarctic in February, it was represented to me that the facts regarding the refusal of members of the Falkland Islands Defence Force to provide a Guard of Honour on the occasion of my return to the Colony from leave last November were not exactly as had been stated at the time. While I and my advisers regarded this "explanation", coming three months after the event, as disingenuous to say the least of it, I was very willing to use it to bring the matter to a close. As a result of further investigation I am mysolf satisfied that the facts as stated at the time were substantially correct, although it is possible that a slight degree of misundorstanding may have existed. however it was manifestly desirable to remove any doubts that might remain I decided to give the Force an opportunity of doing so. The new Town Hall is to be opened formally next month, and the Commending Officer of the Force called a general meeting and intimated that if the members were prepared on that occasion to furnish a Guard of Honour, this would be accepted as an expression of regret for their failure to do so on the former occasion. A meeting was accordingly held at which those present (including the previous recalcitrants) overwhelmingly expressed their desire and intention of finding such a Guard. On receipt of this information I instructed the Commanding Officer that the suspension of the Force was lifted, and that all its activities should be resumed forthwith.

November as closed, and am persuaded that the action taken has had a salutary effect, I share the Commanding Officer's view that the constitution of the Force needs amendment, as stated in paragraph 3 of my Secret telegram No. 298 dated the 23rd of November, 1949, and I should be grateful for any suggestions, or for a model Ordinance, for strengthening the discipline of the Force.

Force consists of half Company of volunteers. It resumed activities in April, 1950. Unquote.

- 3. Mo reason given publicly for suspension apart from that contained in address to Legislative Council in which operative clause was quote Force without & officers is as useless as Force without discipline unquote. There was widespread belief that deliberate affront had been offered to me and this had been immediately reported to London Daily Telegraph by local representative, quoting telegrams exchanged by me with Acting Governor.
- E. You are aware that Defence Force Ordinance, 1990, confers no effective disciplinary powers on officers and it may interest you to know that and in Command (a local) who would normally succeed Butler when latter goes to S.Georgia has tendered resignation giving as reason lack of support or interest except by half-dozen in any aspect of Force apart from Rifle Club and Canteen.
- 4. I accepted a belated and disingenuous explanation of quote Misunderstanding unquote, some of which may have been genuine, purely to get the incident put out of the way but see no point in mentioning this. I remain of the opinion endorsed unanimousl by my advisers that Force is of no (r.no) military value.

I have the honour to refer to your secret despatch No. 6 of the 25th April, 1950 regarding the desirability of new legislation in order to strengthen the discipline of the Falkland Islands Defence Force.

I enclose a copy of the Federated Malay States Volunteer Enactment, 1924, and I suggest for your consideration that an amendment to the Falkland Islands Defence Force Ordinance, 1920, to incorporate the general principles embodied in paragraphs 24, 25, 28. 32, 33. 34 and 35 would achieve the desired purpose. The wording would, of course, have to be modified in the light of local conditions. In the absence of any Regular Forces in the Colony it would be inappropriate to insert any references to the powers or composition of courts-martial. A Section similar to the present Section 27, or to Section 17 of the Malay States Enactment, providing that members of the Force should be subject to the Army Act when called out in emergency or when attached to any of His Majesty's Regular Forces should, however, be retained.
