

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

For the first few days my great difficulty was to grasp the idea that practically everyone in Russia. or at least the vast majority, were servents of the State, or of a municipality, or a frust. There were exceptions. A man, for instance, could set up as a cobbler-but if his business grew he could not employ an assistant because that was contrary to the notional doctrine that no man should ove his employment to another, but apparently he could take another cobbler as a portner and so satisfy the collective as opposed to the individualistic principle. Common or collective own rship preclades personal ownership and that is the key which unlocks in the Soviet Union Many conditions which are otherwise inexplicable.

The system has in at least one way definite advantages over one man business. In Leningrad, for instance. I noticed food stores wore open very late at night and on enquiry I was informed the stores epched very early in the morning and did not close till very late at night, although it did not make any difference to the store employees the worked only their seven hours a day. Such a system means, of course, in proctice that work people in Leningrad con always be certain of buying food me matter when they commones or leave of 1 work.

Opportunities for observing state planning force th uselves upon you ... It is founte noticeable, for instance, that museum attendants are elmost invariably superannuated old women or unfit men; elevator attendants and weiters are likewise generally move or less decrepitand service is Focordingly slow. Street cars, which are generally driven in strings of three are nearly always driven either by an older man or Woman, while the conductor is invariably a woman; train conductors , equivalent to our guards and ticket collectors, were in y experience oftener women than men.
