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#### **CIPCULAR**

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## Downing Street,

13th June, 1944.

I have the honour to inform you that the Army Council have under consideration a suggestion that British Army personnel on dispersal from the Colonies after an armistice in Europe might receive in addition to any form of war gratuity that may be approved, and a period of leave on ordinary pay and allowances, an "overseas service grant" which would probably take the form of a lump sum payment equal to one day's pay and allowances of their rank for every month of overseas service since 3rd September, 1939, provided that they have served overseas for a minimum of six months.

2. There are several difficulties which arise in the application of the above principle to the Colonial forces, and overseas Commands have been requested to consult Colonial Governments concerned on the following points:-

(a) Whether an "overseas service grant" is recommended; and if so

(b) what scale is recommended, and

(c) what rules should be adopted as regards the definition of "overseas service" bearing in mind that the main purpose of the grant should be to compensate men for prolonged and enforced separation from their homos, and that in the case of some units personnel have been granted periodic leave to their country of enlistment or embodiment.

3. The question of the application of an "overseas grant" to personnel of units of the United Kingdom forces who were enlisted or commissioned in overseas Commands and for whose dispersal on repatriation overseas Commands will be responsible, is also under consideration.

4. As the general responsibility for the resettlement of Colonial personnel is primarily a matter for the Government of the Colonial Dependency concerned, I shall be grateful if you will discuss with your Military Authorities and furnish them with information as is required.

5. The fact that the question of such a grant is under consideration should be kept strictly secret.

## Oversoas Service Grant.

The following definition of Overseas Service which has now been adopted by War Office is sent to you for information:~

## Overseas Service.

(1) Except as provided in (11) and (111) below, the empression "overseas service" means all paid service from and including 3rd September, 1939, while based outside Great Britain, Northern Treland, Eire and the neighbouring islands including the Channel Islands and the isle of Man.

(11) Where an application for repairiation to a place outside the crea defined in paragraph (i) is admitted, or where an individual is pelessed outside that area, the expression "overseas service" means all paid cervice from and including 5rd September, 1959, while based outside the area as defined in paregraph (111), in which the individual had his sole or principle place of residence before joining His Majesty's Forces.

(iii) For the purpose of paragraph (ii), territories will be grouped into the following areas:-

(a) The Forth Caribbeen Area, namely Jamaico, Bahamas and British Honduras.

(b) The South Caribbean Ares, nomely Trinidad, Windward Islands, Leeward Islands, Brithen Culana and Barbados.

(c) The Jest African area, namely Migeria, Gold Coast, Sterre Leone and Gambias

(d) The East African area, namely Uganda, Konya, Tanganyika, Nyasalond, Zanzibar and Northern Ehodesia.

(e) The South African open, namely the Union of South Africa, Beshemalund, Svesiland and Baeutoland, Complete

(2) Persia and Trag.

(g) Egypt, Sudan, Palestine, Transjordan and Syria.

(b) Pederated Malay States and Straits Settlements.

(1v) For the purpose of paragraph (11) where an area is not grouped as above it will be regarded as a separate area.

(v) Service which is non-reclonable for age and service

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grouping under Release Regulations paragraph 305 (c) (i) - (v) will not count for overseas service benefit. Service overscas forfeited under Release Regulations paragraph 305 (c) (vi) whether restored or not, will count for overseas service benefit.

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
