scenber 27th 1911 arrived at Government getty 1 pm. for departure for Shellands per S.S. Solstruf, proceeded to sea in moderate weather in afternoon, The fourney was of a calm type until noon 30 December, when Solstreif in fog o snow struck heavily on rocks of Cape Mchville and went over them, whaler Eik was on the port bow + shortly after came as close as tide + swell allowed . after some lime life touts were put out, one cank , a fremen was drowned, The feeling on board was that the whole ships bottom had been torn off, Timmediately offered the Coptain my assistance, then secured government property in the chape of stamps + seals + great coat. Two hours later with the captains permission I left the ship in lifeboat & got on to "Eik" with some fifty of the workers + continued my voyage to Deleption Island where we arrived about 4.30 am 31 of Dec 1917 On arrival at Ocception Isd Solstreif had not gone down at all but most of the ballast tambo appear to be full, title appears to be able to be done until considerable discharge of eval is affected . In order to Save ship + get her into seaworthy condition + filled with oil, I have suggested to the Captain that he should take any material whatever now lying on shore and mostly the property of the Heptor Company, He agreeing to pay this Company, and I taking a list of the soods so wed as a check. Great credit is due to Captain, officers , I ever, for the fine way wol way in which

Der 31 st could then prevailing where but a few moments before the impact, I was on the bridge, and it was then very thick, & cold, Jan 15/ 1918 So far as can be found No 273 water ballast tanks are badly damaged from the bottom, a small quantity of water is coming into a bunker, whales are now looking for other factories, should they be here, there is no trace of them in Deception Island. before much can be done the bottom of the ship must be examined , damage known, failing finding factories in S Shetlands, the Captain considers of Sagree that it would be best to fetch a diver from Punta axenus together with coment for the repair of the ship if such a course is possible otherwise Solstreif must be left in Deception for the winter for the damage is considered too wear to wish the ships to sea. During the week the weather conditions have consisted of the usual cold, damp, for type, two dap lowever were of the fine bright runny order. Feb 2nd

On the 24th at 1/pm a somewhat strong earthquake was experienced, felt strongly on the ship. On the 30 th. Whaler Bok" entered from Punts arenos, twas later followed by the Rejandto : a small vessel owned by Braun & Stanchard of Punta arenes, with salvage geer on board for the repair of the ship. Diving operation were at once commenced, and later the engineer in charge UT Robbins informed me that, had the Solstraif not been so finely constructed a ship as she is: she must have such like a stone, another 3 miles less water would ustainly have proved fatal to the ship, in one tank alone No 2 there are 22 damaged spots. On Feb 1st I was requested by Soft Berggreen Thor I to deal with some of his famaium crew as they refused duty otherefore work was impeded, I heard all sides + fined 6 men 10% each for refusing duty, a case of assault of a witness arising out of this case I. dismissed as all parties were lying, Ithen mustered all west Indians 20 in number on deck of addressed them, I am informed that since this, they are a totally different crew owork splendidly The weather during the week has been variable, Fog. oull. + periods of heavy onow, whales are more numerous, but very poor in oil

On board solstreif two of the Latin crow-workers, on the 4 Feb. appear to have disagreed, whereon a Spaniard found a large pot of boiling tea over an argentine, the argentine who was very badly burned on the face, chest, stomach & both arms, refelled with a knife sticking the spaniard in the chest, I do not feel clear as to the position of this case, being as it is on board a Foreign ship in a brilish varbour, The bapt has not charged them . The week's weather has consisted of a minture that is to be expected - Bales, heavy snow, warm intervals, a intensely cold periods with an absence of fresh water at times, Some fin , Slue wholes have been eaught, finbacks are reported as being more plentiful On March 1st . Thor I returned to Deception Isd. Laving been some 8 days in Belgia Straits. - Melchim Id. Harbour? He reports exussive cold. Jule 7 mon. an almost total absence of whale in sheltered waters there . but out to sea, well clear of the land a large amount of finisheles are to be found - in seas too rough for their capture, there whales have been reported for the last 5 wieks, bupt Berggreen states that he had captured 5 specimens of Minkehonl", a small while that abounds in quiet channels, B. autorostrata, - Lesser & Rudolphis Whale - This whale is from 20-30 feet long. On the 8th Svend Joyn rubalers returned to Deuption Isd reporting a searcity of whales in the Strats + also the cufeture of 4 Right whales by from II Mar 16th Whales have been more abundant than at any time since our arrival, on the 13th Bjirk returned from Punta arenas The weather has been of a winter type bright a sunny, often freezing, & much snow, frequently no water has been obtainable from the shore, Whaling is so bad in the Straits that Own returned here on the 16th & Bomboy is expected at any time, So that all 5 factores will be in Deception Harbour, This is not a good scheme either for whaling of March 23rs On the 17th 2 shalers lost 8 whales as a result of gala, 5 were recovered later. On the 18th Bombay returned all reporting almost total absence of whales in the South, Dwing to gales not many wholes caught. much snow falls with bright intervals, very what, all fresh water except a quantity exuding from under a glacier some 3 miles distant, of frozen up. This diary I passed into the Office of the Colonial Secretary, with other papers, on April 27th, as my letter of appointment in C/S 1113/17 to S. Shetlands was received from that office, I naturally returned the various papers etc there. However on landing from the Cargo boat, I find it is returned for transmission through you.

The fellowing vessels operated at South Shetlands and Grahams Land, during the Whaling Season 1917-1918:-

(1) Solstreif. arrived 31/12/17

(3) Thor 1 " 15/1/13

(3) Orn 11 " 10/ 3/13

(4) Bombay " 11/2/13

(5) Svend Foyn " 12/2/18

The season has not been good, this may be accounted by:-

- (a) The very hate arrival on the Whaling grounds of the factories, especially of the "Orn 11", "Bombay#, and "Svend Foyn", these three vessels did not start operations until 12-14 th of February, a time of the season when the good weather has gone, and quite hopeless to expect even half a cargo, starting at a period, that, in normal years is considered the finish of the season.
- (b) On arrival at King George Land. South Shetlands, on 30/13/17, the "Solstreif" ran over a reef. of rooks severely damaging the vessel, in a fog. The Whale Boats "Bok" and "Bjerk" were employed, each for 34 days at different times, to make voyages to Punta Arenas. Chile, in connection with the extensive repairs necessary to save both ship & cargo, thus this factory had but two Whale Boats, whaling for a large part of the time, with a consequent loss of at least 3000 barrels of oil, as a result.
 - (c) The number of new men sheeting whales, for the first time at S. Shetlands, although expert shots the want of local knowledge told against them, to

to some dogree.

All factories arrived too late to participate in the finest part of the Blue-whale fishery, (end of November to early January).

The "Solstroif remained in Reception Harbour the whole season, this was necessary until March, owing to the damaged condition of the ship, and the necessary repairs made thereto.

"Ther I" arrived at Deception Isd. with four boats, from South Georgia, on January the 15 th, this ship remained all the season, except for a short time, February 31 st to Marchlet, when this vessel was operating in Belgica Straits. On his return, the Gaptain, stated that the conditions were bad, few whales, and that he had made but 700 barrols of oil. "Orn 11" Bombay "& "Swend Foyn" went to Belgica Straits to start, they returned to Deception Isd:
"Swend Foyn" March 5th with about 1800 barrels,

"Orn 11" March 16th with about 2000 barrols,

- "Bombay" March 18th with about 200 barrels,
 On March the 26th, these three factories again left, for the
 Belgica Struits, the weather much less violent there than in
 Deception 1sd, These ships remained in Belgica Straits for the
 remainder of the season. During their stay in Deception 1sd,
 the "Orn 11" made 1300 and the "Bembay" 1000 barrels of cil, the
 "Svend Feyn" produced about 2000 barrels.
- (2) The total production of oil, (less the catch of the "Svend Foyn," which I understand to be about 3000 barrels, fuller figures I could not ascertain, as the vessel went direct from Belgica Straits, to South Georgia without being able to furnish me with the necessary information), amounts to 47,605 barrels, Estimating the oil 9 £50 a ten would give a value of 5 £96,700. The average barrels of oil per whale, mide in the season being 51.6 as

compared to 46.3 in 1916-7.

(3) Owing to shipping entering, & clearing to, & from Funta Arenas, Chile, in connection with the relairs to the "Solutreif" I was prevented from visiting other parts of the Dependency, either to the North or South, and therefore unable to collect, or observe minerals or animals of accentific or commercial value, or report on the many se-called harbours.

As the season was a poor one, all factories remained worling until weather conditions became impossible. The first to leave was the "Selstreif" on April the 12th, followed by the others on the 13th 6 14th.

The Hektor Company's Land Station at Deception Island was not at work during the season.

Schedules A to F(six) show the catch in figures, and in comparison to the previous season.

OBSERVATIONS

The season 1917-18 appeared to me, to exactly resemble season 1915-4, as from January enwards. Whales were never abundant in Bransfield Straits, it was stated by several of the gunners that, there was a marked absence of Whale-food-Hankton-crustacea, this might be accounted for, by the almost total absence of icobergs & smaller ice in these Straits, during the season. The temperature of the water was found to be 36.F. in February & March. The Swedish Expedition reported the temperature as being 39.F. in January 1902?. This rise in temperature could affect the Plankton-life, - the principal feed of whales in these waters. From statements made to me, by gunners the same conditions

provailed in the Blegica Straits, with one exception in the 3rd week of January. Whales were then plentiful.

Two Whale Boats, "Bol" Bjork" made trips to Chile these reported large numbers of whales, mostly "Fin," between 40 & 100 miles from land, they were thought to be feeding. Those whales were also seen by arriving fectories, and the reports extended from early January to late February. No large numbers entered the whaling grounds, at any time.

Hump-back Whales were reported by the gunners, as being more common than in recent years, of those caught during the present season, they formed 6.4% of the whole, us compared to 1% in 1016-7. Of these 20 were seen by me, of the 20 none were lighter in oclour than NeS, many were as dark as Ne4 by the scale given in Dr, Lillie's "Rejort on the New Zealand Hump-backed Whales.
