It is particularly requested that all possible care shall be taken of the glass cases containing live plants and addressed to Sir W. Hooker, Kew Gardens, as they are species of much economic importance and which it would be highly desirable to introduce into Great Britain - that the most all care should be taken not to break the glass, and if such an accident should happen a piece of board might be nailed so as to exclude air and water. The live stuff should be placed in such a part of the stuf as may be most convenient for access to air and light, but at the same time should be guarded from the intensity of the Sun during the passage across the tropics. By the letter which I have this day received from you it does not appear clear to me how Constable Parry could swear that his boat "was obtained, knowingly, unlawfully and designedly, by false pretences, to enable said parties to abscond from this colony": but I presume you would not have taken his deposition on oath or granted a warrant for the apprehensions of the men unless you were sufficiently satisfied on this point. Information has also reached me from other sources which not only induces me to fear the men have absconded with the boat but that if they should reach another body of disaffected foreign whalers (the whole being armed) the junction might lead to much mischief in the present situation of the Colony. I am also induced to apprehend that the success of these men may tempt other unprincipled persons to follow their example.

With respect to their being in debt I confess I do not feel much compassion for the creditors as nothing can be worse, or more injurious in its tendency than the practice persisted in by many of the Colonists, granting almost unlimited credit and in many instances every lending sums of money to idle worthless men.

Taking all these circumstances into consideration I will immediately afford you

I had framed a letter to you in consequence of it having appeared to me that you materially misunderstood your duties and your position with respect to myself. The letter I have received from you this morning dated April 5th I am happy to say equalles me to substitute another worded in a very different manner.

I will now proceed to answer your letter interpersing it with sundry observations. The whole communication you will receive as instructions for your guidance on the present and on all future occasions.

I will first refer you to my Circular of the 31st March & state that it was drawn up in consequence of the inequal manner in which you have almost invariably endeavoured to transact public business with me. Had you attended to that circular you would have avoided referring from me on this occasion. You are now clearly to understand that although I facilitate public business I do not object to grant interviews to you or any other person. I am induced by a variety of important considerations not to receive the verbal communications made to me on such occasions as final or sufficient in themselves to enable me to act upon them (or to be referred to) excepting when a delay may be productive of serious public injury as in the present instance. Had I received some information from you verbally and as I consider privately I do not deny, but the information, upon which I have grounded my fear of what the junction of these men with other parties might lead to, was derived from other sources. This mistake will be sufficient to prove to you the importance

parted from my sister I consider verbal communications alone sufficient. To close this portion of my letter having reference to official communications I regret I should have I add a desire that you will send them in a manner altogether different & that of the first with you took the liberty of addressing some on the 11th Inst. I conceive that note could only have been composed under a very mistaken idea of our relative positions.

At the Command of Her Majesty conveyed in a warrant which I received through your hands I signed a Commission under the Seal of the Colony appointing you to be a Magistrate for these Settlements. Without in any way wishing to deprive you of the dignity attached to the office you hold I am obliged to state that Subjunctive a Magistrate is a very subordinate Officer of the legal Department and although I work that Dept. in the small Colony entrusted to my Government, I must have not deemed it necessary to appoint any legal functionary of higher dignity and importance and although the consequence be that such Officer of subordinate rank may finally at times be called upon to perform duties which would elsewhere be entrusted to a legal Officer of more elevated rank yet I consider the contemplation of the possibility of being called upon to perform these duties should not engross the mind of a Magistrate to the extent as to cause him to be desirous of performing the duties more strictly appertaining to that office.

I do not perceive how you could consider I intended or wished you to act as a Constable indeed

I fully agree with you that such a position would be extremely "undignified and anything but conducive" to the respect to be entertained for justice. I quite approve of your desire to maintain your dignity and would be the last person to detract from it or suffer any thing to take place which might have that effect. I merely require you to act in conjunction with the armed party placed under your orders as a Magistrate would have to do under similar circumstances in England with a Military or other armed force.

I do not exactly comprehend the meaning or intention of that portion of your letter where you write "I would respectfully call your Excellency's attention to the prudence of requesting me to accompany a party of Constables on a Coasting Voyage round the Islands on an expedition to capture men on whose case I may have to sit as Judge." - If I am to infer from this you consider such a proceeding illegal I can only say it does not appear to me so flagrant to the spirit of the English Constitution when it is considered that in this Colony the whole of the working branch of the judicial establishment is centred in yourself but as I am not at all desirous of considering myself an authority on points of Law I leave you to take the responsibility of suffering these individuals to escape for unless you accompany the armed party I must assuredly and will not suffer them to go in pursuit of the Henders as I conceive it to be so highly probable that an armed resistance may be offered.

You state "circumstances might occur of vital importance & render your services in the Colony (I presume you mean at Stanley) indispensably necessary" I think I am the best judge as to where

When your services seem to be most necessary, at all events I consider this to be a portion of the responsibility I have to bear as Governor.

You may call upon me to consider the "prudence of requiring you to lay before me copies of all the voluminous documents connected with the administration of justice" knowing that you may decline doing so I recommend you to re-consider the paragraph in my letter appurtenant thereto & provide such papers might be very important in you. In my letter I advise you "in all similar communications to acquaint me in writing with every circumstance that may come to your knowledge and to lay before me copies of all depositions, your warrants and other documents," - and I repeat my desire as I shall always be very guarded in placing armed parties at your disposal the more so as I now perceive you do not attach the importance I do to a Praxis that accompanying such party: in fact I do not perceive that you attach any importance to such an arrangement at all.

With respect to your furnishing me with such documents being unconstitutional I am willing to abide the responsibility I am also inclined to consider myself the best judge as to how far it would be "productive of material inconvenience to the public service" I presume you do not mean inconvenience to yourself as you must be conscious of the ample leisure at your command. Should you become much occupied at any time with public business be assured I will make every allowance in consequence but upon this!

the head I have no objection to afford you every relief by merely requiring you to lay before me the original documents for my perusal. Copies of such parts as I consider necessary may be made in my office with a full and clear report from you. I shall always consider necessary.

You state you have received your instructions "from the Ministers" I request you will furnish me with a copy of them. I would on no account take any steps contrary to the Secretary of State's instructions to you and am surprised you should so long have supposed me to remain in ignorance of them.

Sidation:-
