much that I cannot at present
render you the service which you
stand in need of.

The Squadron under
my command consists of six small
Vessels besides my Flag Ship —
of these three are required in the
River Plate for special service.

and for the protection of British
Interests, which the unsettled
aspect of affairs renders imperative—
and the other three, I need hardly
say, are so necessary on the
Coast of Brazil that I cannot
with propriety withdraw one from
that part of the Station at present,
to send her to the Falkland
Islands— I will however
do all that is within my power
to meet your Excellency's wishes,
at the earliest convenient opportunity,
and in the mean time I will
refer your letter to the Lords
Commissioners of the Admiralty
that their Lordships may, if
they think fit, direct the required
service to be performed by one
of the Ships proceeding to or returning
from

from the Pacific.

As the 'Trinemalee' was not under my command but was proceeding to join Rear Admiral Moresby, I should have been unwilling to sanction her detention at the Falklands beyond the time stated in my orders to Captain Houston, viz two or three days, and as it is possible her proceeding to New Island might have been attended with an unforeseen delay, I believe Captain Houston only acted in what he believed to be the spirit of his orders in not complying with your requisition.

That Your Memorialist having
been abroad, it ^{was} not until the 2^d inst. that
he had the honor of receiving the letter dated
the 3th of last month which the Right Ho-
norable Sir John Packington directed to be
written to Your Memorialist.

That Your Memorialist has seen with
great satisfaction that all the papers he had
presented to Her Majesty's Government with
his Memorial (which, through an involuntary
mistake he had sent in without date and
which ought to bear date, that of the 7th
May last) and with his further Memorial
(likewise without date, and which should bear
that of 6th September last) had been referred
by the Right Hon^{ble} Sir John Packington
to the Governor of the Colony at the Falkland
Islands for report, Your Memorialist conside-
ring this as the most conducive step to eluci-
date the matter.

That Your Memorialist having
been informed that Capt Henry Smith R.
N. (whose son acted, under his guidance, as
Agent

ent for the transaction of Your Memorials =
the private affairs at the Colony, from
the years 1834 to 37) is at present in England,
wrote & sent a letter to that Gentleman on
the 3rd inst. requesting some explanations regard-
ing matters on which Your Memorialist
required information, in consequence of his
having been absent from the Colony since
Nov^r 1831, and of his having received after
the death of his former Agents, only two short
letters from Capt Smith and one from his son
(the last Agent Your Memorialist had at the
Colony.)

That Your Memorialist received
a letter from Capt. Smith, dated 5th instant,
containing some of the information required, and
which as he considers may conduce to a further
elucidation of the case.

Your Memorialist, therefore, begs leave
to enclose herewith, copies of his
letters, and that of Capt. Smith, in
order that they may likewise be
referred to the Governor of the Colony
in case Her Majesty's Government
should see fit so to do.

London 3rd Nov^r 1834

Capt Henry Smith, R. N.

Sir,

I beg to inform you that I have come to England, from Buenos Ayres, for the purpose of claiming the restitution of my private Property, which was taken possession of on the East Falkland Island, on or about the Period you were in command there.

You will recollect 1st that you were put in command of the Falkland Isl^{ds} in January 1834 - 2^d that you found in my store house a quantity of Ox Hides and Seal skins - 3rd that you recovered by your own exertions some sixty of my imported Horses, and a part of my tamed Cattle, which had strayed away in consequence of the death of my unfortunate Agents Mess^{rs} Brisbane, Dickson, and Simon - 4th that you appointed your son to be my Agent in order to continue my Affairs as well as the ruinous State of the Settlement would permit - 5th that your son continued to act as my Agent all the time that you remained in charge of the Island - 6th that your son, as my Agent, took care of my property, and accumulated all this time more Hides and Cattle, and that he encashed the money arising from the sales of beef.

These facts premised, allow me to make you the following questions, trusting you will do me the favor to answer them with candour.

1st - Why did you appoint your son as my Agent? -

3rd When was this property taken possession
of, who took possession of it, and from whom
have I to claim the same?

4th Did the party who took possession
of my property, take care to pay all the
claims of the persons employed in the acquisition
of this property, among which, I recollect, was
a debenture of mine in favor of my unfortu-
nate Agent Simon, for his services in acquiring
that very cattle, of which you, as said before,
recovered a part by your exertions? Were there
any other debentures or obligations of mine, and
if so, what was their total amount?

Agent?" — Because he was the only fit and
capable person on the Island, no one else being
able to keep accounts, and to relieve myself of
the obloquy cast upon me for trading. Which
appointment met your approbation, shown by
letter to me and also to my son. —

N^o. 2— "What quantity of property did your son
accumulate for my account during his Agency?"
— When I was ordered to place the account of the
sales of beef &c to the British Gov^t, the whole
of the sales, from my appointment to my
being superseded, were remitted to the comman-
der in chief, consequently my son delivered
every thing up to me. —

N^o. 3— "When was this property taken posse-
-sion of, who took possession of it, and from
whom have I to claim the same?" — You had
better apply to Admiral Sir Graham Eden Ham-
mond Bart^t, who lives at Yarmouth Isle of
Wight, Hampshire. —

N^o. 4— "Did the party who took possession
of my property, take care to pay all the claims
of the persons employed in the acquisition
of this property?" — When I was left at Port
Louis.

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To

Louis, Berkeley Sound, East Falkland
place was a perfect ruin - no Cattle -
Horses held by the murderers in the Interior
after the capture of the assassins, I formed
the Colony "de Novo" looking upon the Horses
&c. as your property and employing those
Gauchos, who had not dipped their hands in
human blood, as you had previously employed
them; and the labourers were always paid,
agreeably to your contract, in hard Dollars,
the moment their work was done. On my
giving up Charge, there was between 300 &
400 domesticated Cattle, 59 Horses, 800 dry
and salt Hides, besides some seal skins, and
there would have been more Cattle had they
not been driven off Long Island by the crew
of an American Whale ship.
