It is this day mutually agreed by and
 between His Excellency Richard Clement
 Moody Governor of the Falkland Islands on
 behalf of Her Majesty Queen Victoria and
 Richard Almond Williams on behalf of
 Samuel Fisher ^{Merchant of Montevideo} before, that in consideration
 of the said Governor having delivered over
 to the said R. A. Williams one hundred and
 sixty five Cattle the said R. A. Williams
 hereby undertakes to return to such person
 and at such time as the Governor for the
 time being may appoint Twenty five
 tame Cows, Five tame Bulls of three years
 and upwards and twenty keifers of two years
 old and upwards or any portions of the
 said stock which the Governor for the
 time being may ^{in writing} require between the
 first day of September 1847 and the first
 day of September 1849 on one months
 previous notice being given.

It is understood that the said

Stock/

Stock shall be formed as ^{far as} practicable
with the above conditions out of the herd
now delivered over.

It is also agreed that for every six
months during which the said cattle shall
be in possession of the said R. A. Williams
after the first day of September 1847 the
said R. A. Williams shall add to the herd
fifteen heifers from one year old and
upwards.

This agreement shall be null and
void on the second day of September 1849

have hereunto set their hands at
Government House Stanley Falkland Islands
the 4th day of August 1847.

By this public Instrument of Protest and declaration
 be it known and made manifest unto all whom it may
 concern that I, Thomas Evans, Master of the Barque Queen of
 the Isle of Glasgow, 217 Tons registerment do solemnly
 protest and declare that on the 19th day of March 1849 we
 left Liverpool with a general cargo and after we passed the
 latitude of about 26° South we encountered a series of heavy
 gales generally from the South West, and that being in latitude
 55° South or thereabouts we encountered a hurricane, during the
 violence of which a sea struck the ship, swept her decks, and
 carried away her bulwarks, stanchions, and the boats with
 their contents, the water coxles, and all other moveables on deck;
 the Main-hatch was stove, and the tarpaulins torn, the head
 rails and side-water started: After the Gale abated we ran for
 the Falkland Islands, and anchored in Stanley Harbour on the
 9th day of June instant, and on the 9th I gave notice of my
 intention to note this protest: Whereupon I, the said Thomas
 Evans, Master as aforesaid do protest against the aforesaid bad
 weather, storms, gales, accidents, and occurrences, and all losses
 occasioned thereby, and do declare that the foregoing statement
 is correct and true, and make this solemn declaration con-
 scientiously believing the same to be true.

At a conference held at Government House on the 21st April 1849, by request of Captain Sullivan at which were present His Excellency the Governor and Captain Sullivan and also the Surveyor General and Captain Hammond; Captain Sullivan made the following proposals on behalf of himself and Partners:-

1. To enter upon the immediate occupation of a station on the South shores of Port Phillip under

under the provisions of a Proclama-
tion dated 3rd July 1847, that as
soon as a portion viz- 100 acres
selected by him shall have been
surveyed the same shall be put
up to Public Auction according
to the Royal Instructions, and
should he become the purchaser
he wishes to have a lease for twenty
years on payment of Ten pounds
per annum of 6,000 acres compris-
ing the peninsula on the south
side of Port Harriet and the land
lying westward of a line drawn
due north from the end of Port
Harriet to the chain of hills, bound-
ed

ed on the north by the chain of hills,
 on the south by Port. Fitzroy and
 North Basin and on the West by
 the stream of Stones running
 into the Westend of North
 Basin, as more particularly
 shown in the Map of the Islands
 in the Surveyor General's office.

The Governor agrees to this
 and states that the 160 acres
 shall be surveyed as early as
 practicable.

Captain Sullivan pays one
 pound and is put in possession,
 under the provisions of the said
 Proclamation, of the land above
 described

described.

The Governor at the same
time makes a special reservation
that Captain Sullivan shall in
no way interfere with the Contract
of Her Majesty with Mr Lafone
and that in the event of any
collision arising between their in-
terests Mr Lafone's remedy shall
be against Captain Sullivan and
not against the Crown.

Captain Sullivan under-
takes to observe strictly and in
the full and legal sense all
the rights and privileges granted
to Mr Lafone in the deed of
16th

16th March 1846 and should
 any dispute as aforesaid arise
 Captain Sullivan shall sustain
 it.

Captain Sullivan then pro-
 poses to rent under the terms
 of said proclamation and sub-
 ject to the same conditions a
 station at Port Pleasant in
 proposing this he wished to
 add that he does so on behalf
 of Messrs Mackinnon, Ham-
 mond and Sullivan

2. All the land bounded as
 follows: on the north by Port
 Fitzroy and the Fitzroy River, on
 the

The east and south by Port Pleasant
and Sand Harbour, and the
north shore of Great Pond and
Boundary Pond, and on the West
by a line drawn due north from
Boundary Point ^{*} over the Survey
Station on Mount Pleasant to
the Fitzroy River, including Pleasant
Island and the Isles in Port
Pleasant but excluding East Is-
land and the Islands in Port
Fitzroy.

Captain Phillip Hammond
then proposed to rent the under-
mentioned

^{*} Boundary Point is on the shores
of Boundary Pond and will be found
in the Survey Map of the Country
No 14.

mentioned Station on the same terms and conditions.

3. All the land bounded as follows: on the East side by a line from the Wickham Heights due south over the Survey Station on Mount Pleasant to Boundary Point, thence in a south easterly direction to the East side of the Isthmus of East Cove. Mare Har-
 bour, on the south of St. Charles Sound and Mare Harbour, on the West by Swan Islet as high as the fresh water thence due north by a line drawn to the
 Wickham

Wickham Heights, and bounded
on the north by these heights.

Mr. Vallant then pro-
posed to rent the following
station on the same terms and
conditions.

4. All that land bounded
as follows: on the north by a
line from Boundary Point along
the shores of Great Pond to
Island Harbour by Island
Harbour and Port Pleasant,
on the East and South by the
sea, and on the West by a line
from the East side of the Isthmus
at East Cove, Mare Harbour,

to Boundary Point; including
the Islands adjacent to the sea
coast above described but not
those in Port Pleasant.

The Governor stated with
reference to these propositions
he required some time to con-
sider and as Captain Sullivan
and his partners could not
enter on immediate occupation
nor could the Surveyor General
at this season undertake to
survey them by reason of their
remoteness from the settlement
he thought it advisable to defer
the further discussion relative

to them for the present which was
agreed to by Captain Sulvan on
behalf of himself and Party.

In the meantime previous
to the question of purchase and
lease Captain Sulvan requests
to have a yearly grazing license
under the proclamation of July
1847 which the Governor stated he at present
~~he~~ saw no objection to, and should
~~call in a few days to grant.~~
but would rather before finally
concluding take a few days
to consider over it.
