The Hon. A. J. Baillon on the invitation of His Excellency attended the Council during the discussion of this question.

The Colonial Surgeon in reply to questions by His Excellency stated that from his enquiries he understood that the disease had practically died out and was of opinion that the Order might be revoked.

His Excellency reminded the Council that the disease had not, up to the present, shown itself in the West Falkland, and that care should be taken not to revoke the whole Order too hurriedly, in order to safeguard the West Falkland.

Hon A. J. Baillon stated that the disease was in existence in the Falkland Islands Company's camp at Port Harcourt 14 days ago.

It was therefore considered advisable to take steps

steps to preclude the importation of dogs
into the West Falkland



GAOL REGULATIONS.

Made in accordance with Section 54 of the Administration of Justice Ordinance No. 10 of 1853, by His Excellency Sir Roger Tuckfield Goldsworthy, K. C. M. G., Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies.

1. The Gaoler shall keep a Book (Form A) in which shall be entered the name of every prisoner committed to Gaol, the offence for which committed, age, nationality and previous conviction, if any. The Gaoler shall keep a Conduct book (Form B) in which the conduct of prisoners shall be entered, with such other particulars as may be required from time to time, which book shall be submitted to the Visiting Justices at each visit.
2. All prisoners on entering the Gaol must be searched, everything not necessary for their use while in custody must be taken from them and retained by the Gaoler until their release, and all articles so taken must be entered in a book (Form C). The name of the prisoner, and other particulars required, shall be entered at the time in the Gaol book.
3. The Colonial Secretary, the Colonial Chaplain, the Colonial Surgeon, and every Justice of the Peace, shall at all times have free access to the Gaol and to any prisoner therein, they shall sign their names in the Official Visitors Book, and make such remarks or suggestions as they may deem necessary.
4. All offences committed by prisoners in gaol shall be heard before one or more of the Visiting Justices, but offences of a graver nature which can be summarily dealt with shall always be heard and tried before two Visiting Justices, provided that no sentence shall carry with it an extended term of imprisonment over the original sentence. The names of the Visiting Justices and their rotation shall be published annually in the Government Gazette.
5. Prisoners may see their friends every Saturday from twelve to one o'clock by order of the Colonial Secretary but in the event of misconduct such indulgence will not be granted.
6. Prisoners not at hard labour or in solitary confinement shall be allowed one hour's exercise in the gaol yard every day; but all prisoners, other than those under solitary confinement, shall be allowed one hour's exercise in the gaol yard every Sunday.
7. The prisoners shall rise at 5 a.m. in Summer and 6.30 in Winter, and be locked up in their respective cells at 8 p.m. in the Summer and 5.30 p.m. in the Winter.
8. In case of any riotous conduct or disobedience of orders by any prisoner, the Gaoler shall take such measures as may be necessary to enforce discipline forthwith, and report the case to the Colonial Secretary and to the Visiting Justices for the month, as early as possible, with the view to their dealing with the matter.
9. Two persons shall not at any time be kept in one cell.

10. Prisoners convicted of felony are never to be locked in the same cell with other prisoners.

11. A light is to be kept burning in the passage of the gaol all night.

12. Prisoners sentenced by any Court or Justice to solitary confinement shall be locked up in separate cells. They shall not be allowed to leave their respective cells except in custody of the Gaoler or Warder. Their meals are to be taken in their cells.

13. Prisoners committed for trial or for debt may purchase provisions for their own use, with the sanction of the Gaoler; provided that spirits shall not be allowed to be so purchased, and not more than one pint of beer or wine per day for each prisoner so committed.

14. Spirits shall not be conveyed into the gaol for the use of any prisoner nor shall smoking be allowed without the written order of the Colonial Surgeon.

Weekly allowance for each prisoner not on punishment diet.

2 oz. salt, 7 oz. sugar, a teabag of tea.

Prisoners in solitary confinement are to receive the same as Prisoners at hard labour—except in cases where bread and water has been ordered as a punishment, when the allowance will be 1 lb for males and 1 lb. for women.

A copy of the Diet Table is to be hung up in the Day room of the gaol.

15. The labour to be performed by the prisoners will be directed from time to time by the Colonial Secretary under orders from the Governor.

The following shall be the Time Table for work, &c.

(1.)—Prisoners will rise and dress, sweep out and tidy their cells, and perform such other work as they may be called upon to do until breakfast time.

(2.)—After breakfast until 12 o'clock work in or out of doors.

(3.)—From 12 to 12.30 p.m. dinner. From 12.30 to 1 p.m. clean day room and gaol.

(4.)—From 1 p.m. until the last bell work in or out of doors.

(5.)—After the last bell, supper, carry water and peat.

6.) —Prisoners at work in the cells are to have exercise in the Prison yard from 1 to 2 o'clock p.m. daily, weather permitting.

(7.)—Prisoners are to be discharged at noon on the day of their release.

16. The prisoners will be employed every Saturday afternoon to clean the gaol, wash their clothes, or on such other duties as may be ordered.

17. Female prisoners are to be kept separate from the male prisoners at all times, except during the performance of divine service and they will be under the exclusive charge of the Gaoler's wife, or a matron appointed for that purpose.

18. Each prisoner will be supplied with the following articles, viz.: one palliasse, a panakin and a spoon and fork and a sufficiency of blankets. Clothing will be supplied for use of the prisoners from time to time, for which requisition must be made by the Gaoler through the Colonial Secretary.

19. The Colonial Surgeon, as Medical Officer of the Gaol, shall visit it at least twice a week and see that the proper sanitary arrangements are carried out. He shall keep a book (Form D) and enter all cases of illness therein.

20. Letters shall not be allowed to pass to or from any prisoner unless the same shall be first sanctioned by the Colonial Secretary. The Gaoler shall at once on receiving any letter addressed to any prisoner, or on receipt of any letter written by any prisoner, (the writing of which letter must be by permission granted by the Colonial Secretary) submit the same to the Colonial Secretary for instructions.

21. The Colonial Secretary will be responsible for the general discipline of the gaol, the labour which the prisoners are to perform, and for all disbursements of public money in connection therewith, subject to the instructions of the Governor.

22. Remission of 3 days in each month may be granted for good behaviour to prisoners sentenced to short terms of imprisonment.

Prisoners sentenced to long terms of imprisonment, or to penal servitude, may, by steady industry accompanied by good conduct, if males, obtain remission of one fourth of the sentence, and if females, one third of the sentence—under the system of marks as laid down in enclosure to Circular Despatch of Secretary of State, dated 21st January, 1892.

The minutes of the last meeting held on 25 May were read and confirmed.
Mr. Excellency laid the following matters before the Council

1. Letters from the Manager of the Falkland Islands Company & Mr. Packe applying for renewals of leases.
Mr. Excellency read the letters applying for renewals of leases in accordance with instructions which the applicants understood had been sent from the Secretary of State.
Mr. Excellency recapitulated what had taken place at a former meeting of Council when it was decided not to act on the instructions until the Secretary of State had had copies of all leases, and informed the Council that he had sent home ^{for approval} a draft lease drawn up by Mr. Ronkidge, that he was not prepared to make similar mistakes to those of his predecessors which had entailed the introduction of two or more healing ordinances.
In answer to Mr. Excellency, the Colonial Secretary (Mr. Ronkidge) said he should prefer to have the Secretary of State's approval before leases were issued under the draft lease submitted by himself.
Decided to reply to the effect that until instructions had been received from the Secretary of State the answer already sent to the Manager of the Falkland Islands Company, and Mr. Packe must be considered as final.

2. Damage to boat belonging to Government Mail Schooner, and subsequent action of Captain J. Campbell Government Pilot.
Mr. Excellency read the answers given by Capt. Campbell in an Enquiry to consider the matter, and stated that Capt. Campbell's action in passing the boat as properly repaired was improper.
Mr. Excellency thought that Campbell should be called upon to pay the expenses incidental to prosecution, namely 5/-, the cost of

the summons, and 2*4/-* the cost of serving the summons, and should forfeit his salary during the period of his interdiction.

After discussion it was considered that the case would be met by calling upon Campbell to pay expenses incidental to prosecution and to send in a written apology for his action since interdiction, failing this, to be suspended and the whole matter and all attendant circumstances referred to the Executive Council.

3. Application from McLean for permission to cut pathways from his house to the road

After discussion the question was referred to the legal adviser to ascertain whether the proposed pathway is a portion of the road as defined on the chart. If so, pathway sanctioned conditional on its being properly maintained subject to local control, and on the pathway or any part of it being liable to be surrendered in the event of it becoming necessary to widen the road from North to South.

Similar permission to be accorded to others in similar circumstances.

4. Application from Roman Catholic Priest for free passage in Government Mail Schooner "Hadasah"

Passage approved but payment must be made for food on board at 2*6/-* per diem.

The Bill being submitted was read and approved for introduction into the Legislative Council


2. Ordinance to amend the Administration of Justice ordinance 1876
