I am directed to refer to your telegram No. 1 of the $23 r d$ February, concerning the Falkland Islands new definitive stamp issue, and to enclose the first of the die proofs of the border and vignette of the 1d., 3 d., 4 d., $1 / 3$ and $5 /-$ values.
2. Mr. R. W. Sims, Senior Scientific Officer of the Bird Section of the British Natural History Museum has made the following comments concerning the 1 d., 3d., 4d. and 5/-values:-

1d. - Dominica Gull; the bill is ungull-like. If the original illustration is carefully examined the outline can be seen. The engraver should copy this or an illustration of the Herring or Lesser Black-backed gull - like these it has a red spot, that is a dark spot in this illustration, near the tip. There has been an attempt to show each tail feather. If these feathers are to be indicated instead of suggested then a considerable amount of re-drawing will have to be done. The bird shown in the drawing has 17 tail feathers whereas all gulls have only 12. Secondly the individual tail feathers appear to be wedgeshaped with the wide and hindermost. There should be no need for me to give details of the shape of the feather. Thirdly the tail doesn't seem to "fit" on to the bird properly but appears to sag somewhat.

3d. - Upland goose. Bird in foreground - emphasize black and white stripes on the shoulders. Height of the rorehead should also be increased.

4d. - Steamer ducks. Both birds - the speculum should be clear white, i.e., the white patch on the wing should contrast sharply with the remainder of the upperparts.
$5 /-$ - King Cormorants - sitting bird - the lower jaw should be checked against the photograph. Inpoth specimens the throats look rather pouchy so the head loses its sleekness.
3. As the size of the reproduction of the Dominica gull in the stamp is small, Messrs. Waterlow's will be asked to make the tail feathers suggestive rather than indicative. Proofs of the 3 d ., 4d. and $1 / 3$ vignettes have also been sent to Mr. Peter Scott for his comments as the designs were taken from his original drawings. He is at present out of the country, but is expected back on the 20th March. If he has any further comments to make, they will be forwarded to you by telegram.

4. It will be appreciated if you will advise this Office by telegram whether the proofs meet your approval, subject to the amendments suggested by Mr. Sims and any observations that Mr. Scott may have.
5. Proofs of the border die pulled in the suggested colours are enclosed; Messes. Waterlow's have suggested that all the vignettes should be shown in black and, by adopting this suggestion, the set will certainly appear uniformly attractive. Will you please therefore confirm that the colour suggestions are acceptable to you.
6. A set of the approved designs pulled in colour will be sent to you for your information as soon as they become available. The black and white proofs may be retained for your records if you so wish, but please return the colour proofs of the border die.

Very disemointine.
The colours are far too faded and tend to resemble our present set which I once sew described as "wishyr-weshy". In fact the whole beckeground is weak, the crown is top heave and sprawling and the place name cramped for too near the margin. Personally I doubt whether we could better the border and crow used on the present Dependencies issue (see specimen at mersin). If we ore to interest the philatelic market then me must hove a really attractive set with a bright and cheerful becrecround and a neat, correctly drawn and well centred subject.

I am not an authority on bird life,
but I think the average layman :!ould agree that the steamer ducks are poorly represented. The position of the female (front) is not natural - the neck is too long and the need should sit further back (see plate 8 in attached publication). The hook at the extreme end of the bill is exasperated and gives an almost vicious appearance. I note that ir r. Sims describes the bill of the gull as "ungull-like". I mould co even further and say that the whole picture is ungull-like! The wings appear to be far tho deep and cumbersome and there is nothing graceful about its plight. Pemars the bird would be better represented in a standing position.

I must anolocize ir my criticism is
too harsh, but I feel that if we accent these proofs too lightly, ye might easily become sedaTed with 2 second failure. After the issue of the centenazur set or 1935 the $F_{i}$ llflands enjoyed the privilege of being perhaps the most popular stamp collecting country in the world and this popularity was maintained for almost 20 years until the appearance of the present issue which was received with an sir of misciving in philatelic circles. To my rind it is most important that :!e produce a really fine set which will demand the attention of philatelists throughout the world and ensure a steady flow of revenue for many years.

Finally, I note that the colour chosen for the 3 denomination is olive green. This is contram to an instruction contained at page 15 of $283 / \mathrm{B}$ which provides for the colour of the foreign post card rate to be predominantly red.

Mr. Sims, Senior Scientific Officer, Bird Section of the British Natural History Museum, has made the following comments concerning the Rd., 10/- and £1:-

2d. - Gentoo
The bills are somewhat too long and heavy. The white eye rings to be blacked out. Bird on the right, flippers appear to have an extra joint, particularly right flipper. Generally smooth off outline. Bird on left, flipper should taper more.

## 10/-d. - Carancho

Outline of under surface should be continuous from the neck to under tail. At present there must be a step (out of sight) behind the right thigh. Markings on the lower throat and side of chest should be fewer in number but each larger in size. They are in fact incomplete bars which become complete on the side under the wing.

## £1 - Black necked Swan

The mouth should extend further back nearly to the black feathers of the face. The shading suggesting the body feathers gives a wrong impression, e.g. the upper tail coverts are shown as part of the wing! The artist brushed this so there is little indication for the engraver. I can only suggest that engraver finds a good photograph of a swan, or takes a sketchbook to a local park and examines some swans. In the photograph the swan is seen from its port quarter with neck and head swung slightly towards the camera. In the drawing, the impression of
having an almost rear view of the bird is only just conveyed, but in the engraving it is lost; instead the view seems to be mid-way between side and front with one leg longer than the other.

I am directed to refer to the recent exchange of telegrams culminating in the cable of the 19 th June from this Office, and to confirm that on the instructions of His Excellency the Governor the sum of 84,200 was transferred from the Falkland Islands account to a suspense account on the 25 th June in respect of payments to be made for the new definitive issue of Postage \& Revenue stamps. When payments to this amount have been made to the contractor, a detailed list will be forwarded to you showing exactly how this sum was made up.

As arranged the proofs were discussed with H.E. the Governor and as a result a new border die is being prepared containing the portrait of Her Majesty The Queen which appears on the current $\frac{1}{2} d$ stamp. The $1 d$ and $4 d$ vignettes are being completely revised, and amendments are being made to most of the other vignettes. The additional expenditure has been authorised by His Excellency the Governor, and a formal amendment of contract will be issued in due course.

Waterlows are proceeding with the printing of the stamps and it is anticipated that they will be available for shipment on the "KISTA DAN" which sails during December.

As suggested by this office telegram of the 29th October, a preliminary announcement about the issue could be made in the list December Edition of the Crown Agents' Stamp Bulletin. So that a release date may be arranged you will be advised by telegram whether the stamps are despatched by the "KISTA DAN" and it would be appreciated if you would at that time advise this office, preferably by telegram, when you intend to place the stamps on sale. On receipt of this information an announcement will be made in the next edition of the Bulletin, the stamps will be illustrated and specimens distributed to the Philatelic Press. In this connection an article on the birds shewn in the designs would assist publicity and any article which you may be able to provide will be appreciated.

With the exception of the aerogrammes, which have been the subject of separate correspondence, the new post cards and registration envelopes were shipped to you in May last, and it will be appreciated if you will advise this office whether you intend to release them at the same time as the stamps. This information is required as it will be necessary to send the usual specimens to the Universal Postal Union when the postal stationery is released.

## Notes on birds depieted in the 0 . 3

 Falkland Islands definitive stami jsivi.
## Falkland Island Thrush - Turdus $\frac{f \cdot f a \eta k l a n d i s}{\text { Quoy \& Gaimard. }}$

This bird is found only in the Falklands although a closely related race is found in Tierra del Fuego. It is about the same size as the English Blackbird, khaki-brown above with dark brown head, wings and tail and buff underparts. The most striking feature is the long crange ?-e3s They are very bold in defence of the young. Thrushes prefer rocky coasts and hills, although they have adapted thernseives to breed in artificial sites, such as cowsheds or sinaring shers.
Dominican Gull - Larus dominicanus, Lichtenstein.
These are one of the commonest birds around humen hab-
itations all over the Islands, and are great scavengers,
probably doing a good deal of daniage to sheep, especially at
lambing time. They are large birds, about two feet Ionge,
black on the back and wings, with the rest of the plumage
white. They have a wide range, from the coasts of Granemland
in the Antarctic summer to almost all coasts of South Ancrica.

## Gentoo Penguin - Pygoscelis papua, (Forster).

This penguin is the only one of four species breeding regularly here that can be seen the whole year round. They nest in rookeries, sometimes holding thousands of birds, on areas of flattish ground, anything up to a mile inland. They seem very fond of walking and climbing and delight in taking the longest route from the sea to their rookery. Their distribution is circumpolar on islands generally further south than the Falklands.

## Falkland Marsh Starling - Pezites militaris falklandicus, (Leverkuhn).

The Falkland Starling is known to all the inhabitants as the "Robin". The male has a wonderfully brilliant glowing red almost covering the whole underparts. Due to the lack of trees they nest, as most land-birds here are forced to, in the long white grass which covers vast areas. While the female does all the building and incubating, the male displays himself on a nearby hummock or post and repeatedly utters his idea of song - a harsh squeaky jumble of notes that no-one could call attractive.

## Upland Geese - Chloophaga picta leucoptera, (Gmelin).

The Upland Geese are still ridiculously tame birds though they have been shot for food and had a price on their beaks for years. They make good eating, especially when full-grown goslings and are still very abundant. They are alleged to eat the best green grass chat should be available for the sheep, and in some areas their wholesale slaughter is encouraged. The male is mostly grey above, with white head, neck and underparts, and is barred with black on back and flanks. The female has a dark grey back with chestnut head and neck, dark brown breast and white flanks and is heavily barred with black from neck downwards.

## Rockhopper Penguin - Eudyptes crestatus, (Milie:)

A smaller species than the Gentoo, but much more atitrac.tive, with brilliant yellow head stripe and plumes, and. bright brick-red eye. They also have very strong orance-red bills that can inflict a nasty bite. They breed in close-packed colonies on the tops of cliffs, and frequently have a fifty foot near vertical climb from the sea to their nests. They are named from their method of climbing and they have long sharp claws to help them in their cliff scaling. They lay two eggs, the second of ten being larger than the first, and hatch them during December.

Black-Browed Albatross - Thalassarche me janophris. (Temminck).

Commonly knows as a Mollymawk to seamen and to all in the Falklands. Here they nest only on islands around West Fallciand, although in summer they are one of the commonest offshore birds all round the Islands. They lay a single large white egg on a nest like a pillar, built up with grass and accumulated droppings. In some places the eggs are collected for eating and one egg is large enough to be a meal in itself.

Silver Grebe - Colymbus occipitalis, (Garnot).
A rare bird only in the Falklands, but also occuriting in Chile, Uruguay and Argentina. They are easily overlooked, being a little under a foot in length and preferring to dive when disturbed rather than to fly. The plumage is slate-grey above and white below, with a patch of golden feathers at each side of the head.

Pied Oystercatchers - Haematopus leucopodus, Garnot.
These large black and white birds with long bright red bills are a familiar sight on almostevery beach. They do not catch oysters but live on the mussels on rocks and other small water animals that abound on the shore. They have a peculiar plaintive whistle, always uttered when they are flying. They are also found in the southern regions of Chile and Argentina.

Yellow-billed Teal - Anas flavirostris, Vieillot.
A very common and widespread small duck, frequently shot for food. The only bright spot in their plumage is the brilliant yellow side to the bill, in both male and female. The rest of the plumage is a mixture of buff and fine dark brown vermiculations.

Kelp: Geese - Chloephaga hybrica molvinaruin, Enilizi.
Unlike the other geese found in the Falklondis the Kelp Geese are not relished for food. They spend most of their time feeding on find green seaweed groving on the shores in the intertidal zone, and consequently their flesh has an extremely strong odour. They are fairly common and widely distributed around the shores of the Islands. The male bird is pure white all over, and most conspicuous from a long distance while the female is black and brown above, barred with black and white below. When the femole ix. incubating her five or six large eggs, the male waits close by and acts as a good pointer to the site of the nest.

5/-. King Cormorants - Phalacrocorax albiventer, (Iesson).
These birds are well known in the Falklends, more usually as the King Shag. They are handsomely marked with black above which has purple and green sheen, and white on the nook and below. They are well distributed and fairly common, nesting in large rookeries on the tops of cliffs, where their nests are placed so that one bird on its nost connot quilie reach its nearest neighbour.

10/-. Carancho - Polyborus plancus, (Miller).
The Carancho is a lerge predatory bird well knows in the Falklands for its attacks on sheep and larnbs. Although it is regarded as a pest and shot whenever possible, it secms to be on the increase. It has a fierce arpearance due to the heavy black crest and large hooked bill. It is a very wary bird, which is probably why it manages to flourish.

Black-necked Swan - Cygnus melanocoryphus, (Molina).
This species is the largest water-bird breeding in the Falklands, but is not very plentiful. It is very distinctively marked, with all white body and wings and bleck neck and head. The bill is blue with a red knob at the bese.

## THE <br> MARIANNE-MULLER

N the French stamp design known as Marianne-Muller ", to which is given in the Part II Catalogue the
number 362 , another value has type number 362 , another value ha
been issued during the past months. Deen issued during the past months. appeared so far have been few in
number, and the oldest of them made number, and the oldest of them made
its debut only five years ago, but they its debut only five years ago, but the
have all possessed such striking indi
vidual peculiarities that for vidual peculiarities that, for a small

interesting from a collector's point of view. Readers who specialize in France might therefore like to be reminded of the characteristicts off each stamp.
The design itself, was the work of Louis-Charles Muller, who also was the originator of the " Paysanne" or
"Moissoneuse " type (Catalogue type No. 344 ) currently in use for other values of French stamps. The engraver of the Marianne-Muller was Jules Piel.
This Marianne is very different from This Marianne is very different from
her predecessors by Dulac, Gandon etc. (Catalogue types Nos. 209, 215 , or
$219-20$ ) in that she is young and simple 219-20) in that she is young and simple
and crowned with leaves. She does no wear the warrior's helmet of the Fighting French, nor the Phrygian cap of the Republic.

articl about Muller's work by M. Raymond Duxin. It is sad to relate that

photographs are again the work of Mr. Ronald D. K. Hadden, but the task of printing the stamps was divided
between three of the "Big Four" printers: Waterlow, between three of the "Big Four" printers: Waterlow,
De La Rue and Bradbury, Wilkinson, providing scope for comparative study of the work of three distinguished printing firms, particularly the treatment of the small The three lowest values, $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$., id. and 2 d ., are all the work of Waterlow and Sons, and on these the Queen's pearl earring is most clearly defined. We shall see later that on other values De La Rue have virtually eliminated the
ornament, while Bradbury, Wilkinson seemed uncertain whether to include it or not, finally giving it prominence in the last ( $(\mathbb{I})$ ) value. The source of the $\frac{1}{d} \mathrm{~d}$. stamp, "Tea

"Plucking Tea ", by Mr. Hadden. This, however, did not show the large wicker basket which a picker carries on his or her back when at work in the Nyasaland tea gardens, and another photograph by R. L. Kinsey (Fig. 2), showing a
male picker with his basket, served as a guide for the engraver to include this essential item. The engraver has, in fact, made a worthy attempt to reproduce, on such a small scale, the picker's lace collar and apron with its rolled

a familiar scene in Nyasaland, where the tea crop forms the
country's second largest export.

## United Kingdom

A notice of the order for the stamps first appeared in the Crown Agents! Stamp Bulletin No. 323 of 1 st December 1959 and later the date of release, photographs and your notes on the birds depicted on the stamps in Bulletin No. 324 of 1st January 1960. Copies of both Bulletins are enclosed. Subscribers to the Bulletin at present total 240 in the United Kingdom, and 78 in 22 other countries. The latter include the majority of European countries, Israel, Japan, India, South Africa, Australia and New Zealand. 32 specimen stamps together with full details of the issue, and your own publicity notes, were distributed to the editors of the principal philatelic magazines and national newspapers in the United Kingdom. The recipients are detailed on lists ' $A$ ' and ' $B$ ' enclosed.

In addition details and notes without specimens were circulated to a further 28 persons as shown on list ${ }^{\prime} D$ ' enclosed.
(b) North America

There are over 200 subscribers to the Stamp Bulletin in the United States and Canada. These include dealers, stamp editors, and collectors and the Bulletin is freely quoted in the Press. 35 specimens were sent to the Crown Agents' Washington Office, and these were distributed to philatelic magazines, and those editors of stamp columns in the national press who are able to reproduce the design as illustration of their articles or comments. The names and addresses of those to whom specimens were sent are shown on list 'AA' attached.

In issuing the above specimens, further releases were prepared - copy attached - and copies without specimens were sent to a further 39 individuals as shown on list ' $A B^{\prime}$. Every effort was made to make the geographical coverage of this distribution as wide as possible, and, including the Bulletin distribution, it is estimated that interested people in 35 of the 50 states of America and most of the Provinces of Canada received direct notification about your new stamp.

Future definitive issue of postage stamps.
We have discussed in a general way the arrangements for a new definitive set of postage stamps. The precise timing of this issue is obviously a matter for further consideration. S.P.T. has indicated that the present definitive issue continues to be in demand but we are of course talking in terms of, say, two years hence when it comes to replacement and we have also to remember the effect of the introduction of decimal currency probably seven years from now.
2. In order that any new definitive issue should be well planned, we are already agreed that serious thought should start on this natter now.
3. I have a liking for the idea of an issue of Falkland Island flowers but other people may have better ideas. I think that the background colouring of the stamps is most important and for the Falkland Islands I would suggest that we have sober (but not sombre) colours. I think I have mentioned in conversation the colours which, on a sparkling spring day one sees looking north from Stanley - colours typical of most of the Carp and including of course the colour of the sea.
4. Against such backgrounds a good artist could produce some very attractive flower designs. There are plenty of ideas to be culled from firs Vallentin's book "Plants of the Falkland Islands" (1921). I have a copy in my office.
5. Another source would be colour slides. Mr I.E. Barnes, the former Camp dentist, sent his best pictures of Falkland Island flowers to the National Geographic Magazine in Washington and I have not seen them but before he left here recently he told me that he would try and send me some on his return to England. Meanwhile, he has given me a few slides which I will to you. They are spares and are not of the first quality.

The new 1960 edition of the REII Commonwealth Catalogue has peen received, and like its predecessor it is filled with the latest availlble information in great delail.
For the first time in any general catalogue of British sphere, first day covers of all special issues lave been listed and priced. The seltion on Ireland has been removed from the main section and established in Part II.
Prices have been revised cambully and it should be noted that these are market prices in England at which one can purchase his needs Booklets of all Commonwealth coun tries are covered, as well as minia ture sheets and Canadian precancels. Latest prices for a few key items are noted as follows: Australia $2 /-$ Tasmanian Sesqui, 8/9 mint, 7/3 used, and $12 / 6$ FDC. Dominica 48c definitive of 1954 has risen to 10 from $2 / 6$. We predict this one will go higher.
Fiji 10/- withdrawn definitive of 1954 is now at $20 /-$ mint and used. Ghana 5/- Black Star Line at 35/mint and $32 / 6$ used, and the Lincoln miniature sheet at $35 /$ - both ways. Also, India's 10 Rupee of 1955 , with multiple star watermark is up to 26/6 from 18/-, while the Indian Custodial Forces overprints of 1953-4 have doubled in price. The Malayan 1949-51 definitives of all States have risen sharply and the withdrawn Montserrat $\$ 4.80$ has climbed from 24/- to 60/-! !
New Zealand's $3 / 6$ overprint on 3/6 Fiscal stamp of 1953 is now priced at $72 / 6 \mathrm{mint}$ and $65 /-$ used, and the overprinted "dot" error of 1958 now stands at 55/- mint and 62/6 used. The first QEII issues of Northern Rhodesia, Nyasaland and Southern Rhodesia have inched up farther, and the UN issue of Pakisfan is now priced at $15 /$.
St. Helena's First Postage Stamp Centenary set has more than doubled, the $\$ 4.80$ definitive of Trinidad and Tobago with perf 12 Line has skyrocketed to $62 / 6$ mint and $36 /-$ used, and the "one cent" Provisional of 1956 of the same country is priced at $10 /-\mathrm{mint}$ and $12 / 6$ used. Finally, the obsolete 5 d and 8 d values of Turks and Caicos have tripled in price.
We also suggest you check the perfs on your copies of the Sierra Leone 3d definitive. If perf $13 \times 131 / 4$, it is worth $12 / 6$ mint and 7/. used, whereas perf $13 \% / 4$ all around copies are priced at only 4d and 2d. The stamps appeared with both perfs when the set was first issued. Ireland - Because of changes in postal rates, the printing of $11 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ and $21 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ denominations has been discontinued. Although these values were withdrawn from general sale Novem

None in this group has a high face value, but knowing how little mail comes from Falklands it is best to pick them up now while they are not difficult or expensive to ob tain. It may be a different story once they are obsolata the introduction of a New Consti tution in the Windward and Leeward Islands, a special issue of three stamps will be released January 1 The denominations, 8c, 10c and 25c, will feature an early galleon with the twin peaks of St. Lucia in the back ground.
In vertical format, the stamps will measure $35 \times 27.5 \mathrm{~mm}$ perf to perf and sheets will consist of 100 subjects $(10 \times 10)$. Waterlow is printing them in one color by the recess process on C. A. (Block Captails) watermarked paper. The 8 c value will be red, 10 c orange, and 25 c blue. (Crown Agents)
The design of the twin peaks, called The Pitons, was used by St. Lucia in 1902 on a stamp issuad to commemorate the fourth centenary of the discovery of the island by Columbus. This 2d stamp is a nice little item today. The twin peaks, which form part of the Seal of the Colony are seen from a differ ent perspective on the 10 /- KGV definitive of 1936.

Besides the regular issues, 40,000 unperforated copies have also been printed.

A regular 44 stotinki issue, surcharged 45 stotinki in black, was placed into circulation in 1959. The pink-red stamp, one of the definitive Vegetable Set, depicting tomatoes, was printed in an edition of five million copies. The original design was reprinted before being surcharged but in a slightly different color and on different paper. The paper of the old issue is chromatic, while that of the new one is ordinary and considerably thinner.

Aarriven. This is not always true. But if ever there was a place to which it was appropriate, it must be tho Falkland Islands, lost in the Atlantic, three hundred miles out from the tip of South America.

Seen from Europe, they have all the mystery of the unknown, all the romince of far-off places. But from close to, their charm turns out to be nothing more than wind, rain, sheep and desolation. The Falklands, indeed, have all the romance of a peat bog on a wet day in autumn. The sky is almost constantly overcast and a fine drimale falls on about 250 days in the year. When it is not drimuling, it is pouring. As one traveller wrote, "a region more exposed to storms both in summer and winter it would be difficult to mention".
The scenery is scarcely more attractive. The coastine is majostic enough, with many bays and miets, and thero are bleak and rugged hills in the north. But inland the comerry is dreary and monotonous, a damp and treeless misture of pasture and peat bog, with here and there an occasional jumble of rock

Yet, inhoopitable though the Falklands are, several nations have foumd them worthy of interest. An Englishman first spotted them in 1592. The inevitable Dutchman tumed up a year or two Inter. Then another Englishman silled between the two main kslands and nomed them after Lord Faltiand, a Cavalier hero of tho Clvil War.

But their real history did not begin till 1764, when de Bougainville took possession in the name of the King of France. The latter promptly sold his new colony to the King of Spin. Meanwhile, behind the backs of both monarchs, some Eindithmen quietly settled on one of the two main island. The Spaniards drove them out, but not long aftorwards, no doubt disgusted by the rain, decided to abandon the place themselves.

The next arrivals were a group of Argentines sent out by the Captain-General of Buenos Aires. But after eleven years' occupation they were destroyed by a United States warahip as a reprisal for some interference with American sealers. And so, the islands being empty once again, the British came back. And this time they stayed.

The inhabitants today are mostly the descendants of Scotish shepherds, living chiefly on Isolated farms where almost the
