Downing Street, 7th April, 1925.

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that, in view of a resolution passed at the Imperial War Conference on the 11th of July, 1918, respecting the desirability of enlarging the facilities for inter-Imperial parcels delivery, the Postmaster General made recommendations with a view to instituting a scheme for the exchange with other parts of the Empire through the post of heavy parcels in excess of the maximum weight allowed under the regulations of the Postal Union. These proposals were submitted in 1921 for the consideration of the Governments of the self-governing Dominions and India, but the majority of those Governments were not then prepared to co-operate in the scheme, and it was decided to postpone further consideration of the matter.

2. British merchants and commercial bodies both at home and abroad, are, however, strongly pressing for an arrangement for the conveyance between Great Britain and places abroad of parcels exceeding 11 lb. in weight, and the question of instituting a service of this nature has, therefore, been further investigated. It appears that the facilities at present available to senders in this country for despatching parcels over 11 lb. in weight to many British Colonies and foreign countries, particularly to towns at some distance from a port, are somewhat limited, and that it would be of advantage to the public to be permitted to make use of the machinery of the Parcel Post for the despatch of heavier parcels than are permitted by the existing regulations. So far as the British Post Office is concerned the extension of the limit of weight will give rise to no serious difficulty; and the Postmaster General has accordingly intimated that he is ready to arrange for the exchange of parcels weighing between 11 and 22 lb. with those British Dominions and Colonies and foreign countries which are prepared to accept such parcels.

3. For practical reasons the number of offices authorised in this country to accept heavy parcels will be restricted at the outset; but no restriction will be imposed as to to places in Great Britain and Northern Ireland to which heavy parcels from places abroad may be addressed. The Postmaster General will, however, reserve the right to call upon the addressee to collect a heavy parcel from the normal office of delivery.

4. Heavy parcels will be accepted for insurance, for delivery against payment of Trade Charges, and for delivery free of Customs and other charges, so far as the regulations of the countries of destination will admit; but they will not be accepted for "Express" delivery. It is the intention that, in despatching heavy parcels from country to country they shall, so far as is practicable, be treated in precisely the same manner as parcels not exceeding 11 lb. in weight.

5. In accordance with the practice of the International Postal Union the heavy parcels will be subject to the same limits of size as those applicable to parcels not exceeding 11 lb. in weight; and the maximum amount of compensation payable for the loss or damage of an uninsured heavy parcel will be fixed at ± 1 12s. 0d. in those services where compensation is at present being paid for the loss or damage of uninsured parcels.

6. The sum required by the British Post Office for the treatment in this country of parcels between 11 and 22 lb. received from places abroad has been fixed at 2s. 6d. per parcel. It is not regarded as desirable to introduce a step in the scale of weight between 11 and 22 lb.

7. I understand that while the Postal Administrations of Canada and Newfoundland are still unable to participate in a scheme of this kind, those of the other Dominions are considering the matter, and it will probably be practicable to commence the proposed service with India and with a number of foreign countries at an early date. I shall be glad to learn whether arrangements can be made for extending it to the territory under your administration.

8. I have expressed my concurrence in a suggestion made by the Postmaster General that points of practical detail which arise in arranging the new services should be settled by direct correspondence between the General Post Office and the Postal Departments of the Colonies, Protectorates, etc., which are willing to co-operate in the proposed scheme.
