1. Matters arising from the minutes of the meeting held on 29 October 1976 were discussed. 1.1.0 The Chairman read a reply from Mr Simms to a letter P&T/2/13 about publicity for the new definitive. The Crown Agents suggested that if we wanted a check list we would have to take 9,000 copies which we would be expected to sell, although CA could probably dispose of some 2,000. Discussion took place on several aspects of these check-lists, briefly as follows :-(a) A good case would have to be put to SFC for funds: (b) how to cover any unsold check-lists; (c) how many check-lists could be sold locally; (d) would the check-list really increase sales; (e) brochures produced by Isle of Man and Channel Islands were examined; Mr Stephenson thought these check-lists would increase sales and he considered it would pay in the long term. The Postmaster thought SFC would require figures to go by, and it would not be pos-sible perhaps to indicate how much (if any) extra revenue would be obtained. The Committee considered that whether or not this check-list would sell was an imponderable, particularly bearing in mind that the Falklands would be the first postal Sho and These? authority outside the U.K. to publish one. Mr Halliday joined the meeting and commented that in his opinion the genuine collectors of F. I. stamps would buy stamps whether a check-list was published or not. Thank you for your letter of 1st June from which I am pleased to learn that the Stamp Co-ordinating Committee and the Standing Finance Committee have approved a vote of £5,500 for the preparation and publication of a check list covering Falkland Islands' stamps.

PROPOSED FALKLAND ISLANDS CHECK LIST

Further to our letter of the 27 October on the above subject I regret to inform you that Stanley Gibbons Publications Limited have now confirmed that they are no longer interested in the possibility of producing a booklet of this nature.

This decision has been reached after considerable market research on the part of Stanley Gibbons which indicated that the likely sales would fail to reach the minimum quantity necessary to make the booklet economically viable, even allowing for the fact that you have offered to underwrite the production charges by £5,500. We requested Gibbons to reconsider their decision but, after a further study, they regret that they are unable to alter their original decision.

You may be interested to learn that when Gibbons first intimated their reluctance to proceed we obtained a quotation from an independent printer to ascertain the likely cost of printing. This amounted to £6,150 for 10,000 copies, added to which one would need to consider the costs for the preparation of copy, provision of illustrations and, ultimately distribution. Taking these into account the overall costs of production would undoubtedly reach a total of £8,000 plus.

As you are no doubt aware, Stanley Gibbons are the recognised leaders in the field of catalogues within the UK and without their co-operation we regret that we see little chance of marketing a "check list" effectively. An essential ingredient of such a list is the pricing of the stamps; a feature which to the collector would need the authority inherent in the Gibbons name.

We have considered the possibility of our producing an unpriced list but conclude that the absence of current market prices from a recognised trading source precludes this course of action. My colleagues and I are extremely disappointed that we have to report this lack of success in a venture which we feel would enhance your philatelic reputation. I propose to raise the subject again with Stanley Gibbons in the late Spring, when initial sales of the Coronation issues are known and the increasing interest in your issues has been further consolidated.
