- 58. The postmaster and I have discussed the Crown Agents letter and recommend the following action.
- 2. (1) We recommend the stamp values to be 4 x 3p, 4 x 5p, 4 x 6p, 4 x 10p making a total of 96p. This will mean that the stamps represent local postage, Commonwealth surface rate, second class airmail and the first international sea mail rate.
- (2) We have looked at the designs of the new definitive issue and consider the sailing ship "Hebe" should appear on the front cover of the booklet. We agree that the title should be Falkland Islands and Contents 4 x 3p, 4 x 5p, 4 x 6p, 4 x 10p total 96p be shown also on the front cover. We also suggest that the values should be described on the inside front cover i.e. 3p internal letter rate, 5p Commonwealth sea mail, 6p second class airmail, 10p international sea mail.
- (3) We recommend that RMS Darwin be portrayed on the back cover of the booklet. This will be in keeping with the theme of mail ships. The SS Great Britain does not, of course, come into the category of a mail carrier to the Falklands.
- (4) We agree that the general background should be a dark green colour or some other suitable colour but are prepared to leave this to the Crown Agents.
- 3. The question of deciding on local requirements for stamp booklets is a very difficult one as this is the first time we have ventured into this field. After giving this much thought we think that we should ask for 2,500 booklets.

Your minute above. One point, albeit an important one, worries me about your proposal; for the Definitive Booklet.

2. My understanding of Falkland Islands philatelic policy is that everything we do should be based on sound postal practice, and that we should eschew gimickry of any sort. I am concerned therefore that we are proposing to issue a booklet of stamps which will not contain a stamp valid for international air postage; ie an llp stamp. My reading of your notation of folio 58 leads me to think that there is no llp stamp in our definitive series, though I note that I am able to buy an llp stamp in the recent commemorative issue. What is more, no combination of the other stamps for the proposed booklet will enable a person to send a normal airmail letter. Given the fact that there are relatively few mail-carrying boats coming to these Islands and also that the normal disposition of postal users everywhere is to want their letters to go by the fastest means, it would seem curious to offer for sale a booklet containing stamps of lop value valid for international seamail. Collectors apart, the normal user would quickly realise that the booklet had no real value to him and it would simply be a collectors' item. This, then, leads us close to gimickry.

3. I fully realise that I am generally unfamiliar with philatelic business but I am very unhappy about this proposal and I suggest that we should think again. Would it not be possible to issue an 1lp definitive stamp even at the risk that international postage rates may go up yet again? Or is it out of the question to everprint a stamp of lower value? I should welcome your comments on this, and the Postmaster's: indeed, after you have both had a chance to reflect on what I have said it may be simpler if we were to have a brief discussion about it.





- P&T/2/13 1. Discussion of the new Definitive Issue was taken first so that Mr. Smith could get away early.
  - 1.1.0 Mr. Smith, who designed the "Ship" issue, produced a clear photograph of the Mail Ship "Fleurus" which he had used in this work. The photograph was compared with the proof design from the Crown Agents and the following differences were noted:
    - a) the ship's bow on the design was too high
    - b) there was some doubt if the colour of the funnel was correct.

After discussion of these points it was decided that the difference in the height of the bow would not be so evident when the design was reduced to stamp size, and so was not of great importance. On the other hand, it was essential to have the funnel colours correct, as these would show up irrespective of the size of the stamp. It was decided to ask the Crown Agents to seek confirmation of the colours.

- 1.1.1 PRINTING Crown Agents had recommended, and we had agreed on, lithographic printing as this was very much cheaper than recess. The committee thought that the extra cost for recess printing might not be recovered in increased sales, and printing by this process would no doubt delay the release date. Mr. Smith expressed himself as very happy if the issue was up to the quality of the Turks and Caicos stamps produced by lithographic process, which were viewed again by the committee. All agreed that they were most attractive and of very high quality.
- 1.1.2 RELEASE DATE Crown Agents had given June and July as the release date, but the committee thought an effort should be made to get sales within the current financial year; May and June would be preferable. Even with these dates it would be necessary to have some stamps and the First Day Covers airfreighted, as there would probably not be a charter boat between March and July.
- 1.1.3 Mr. Smith left at this stage.

FALKLAND ISLANDS NEW DEFINITIVE STAMP ISSUE

Further to your letter of the 4 November 1976, I have pleasure in informing you that we have been in touch with Anton von der Lippe, shipowners, who are managers for the Tonsberg Whaling Co, regarding the funnel colours of the "FLEURUS". Although they could only supply us with a black and white photocopy of this vessel, they were able to tell us that it was white with a teak superstructure and the funnel was black with a red belt. The artwork was amended accordingly before being despatched to you on the 1 October 1976. As Anton von der Lippe have been extremely co-operative in supplying this information, we propose sending them a complimentary set of First Day Covers and we trust this meets with your approval.

2 As mentioned in our telegram of 15 November 1976, we are currently considering releasing the new definitive in two stages, as there is very little time available. However, on reflection the revenue earned from sales before June 30 1977 would be of a minimal amount and would not merit rushing the production of some of the values. It would also lead to complications regarding the release of the First Day Covers.

3 It must be borne in mind that the issue will be on sale for several years and it is important that extreme care and supervision be taken at all stages of production.

4 It would be reasonable to expect that prior to the release of the new definitive an increase in sales of the old definitive would be generated by collectors wishing to purchase these stamps before they are withdrawn from sale. A considerable amount of revenue from these sales would fall in your financial year ending 30 June 1977. We would therefore advise that the release date should be postponed until at least August 1977 in order to do justice to this particularly attractive issue.

5 In your letter of the 10 September 1976 and our subsequent letter of the 24 September, the quality of the First Day Cover to be used for this issue was discussed, and we enclose for your reference, three this hand Antarctic Territory Whales First Day Covers and one Antigua Fish Pirst Day Cover. As you will see, the MAT envelope is of a reasonably high quality and the design, printed by the die-stamping process is very

We feel that the die-stamping process greatly enhances a First Day Cover, therefore, increasing sales and more importantly maintaining your very high philatelic reputation. On the other hand, the Antigua Fish First Day Cover printed by lithography on a poorer quality envelope, although attractive, is not as prestigious as the BAT cover. We therefore suggest that the Official First Day Cover for the new definitive should be printed by the die-stamping process on an envelope of a similar quality to that of the British Antarctic Territory Whales Issue. For maximum revenue, we recommend that five stamps should be affixed to a cover making three covers for a complete set. This would enable collectors to store them more easily in their albums (larger FDCs are not very popular with philatelists) and it would also allow for selling part sets of the FDCs. The values should be spread evenly over the covers so that each of the three First Day Covers will have approximately the same face value. realise, of course, that the cover bearing the £3 denomination will be of a far higher value than the other two, but we suggest that the covers should be as equally priced as possible. If this is acceptable to you, we shall be grateful if you will inform us as soon as possible of the values to be affixed to each cover and also of the quantities required by you for At present we propose affixing the stamps to the FDCs here local sale. at the Crown Agents, and we trust that this is acceptable to you. 74) VOI.1

6 In our letter of the 23 August 1976, we suggested that the design prepared by Mr John Smith (photocopy enclosed) should be used as a basis for a cancellation cachet design for this issue. A separate first day cover design could then be prepared, using several colours. We trust that this suggestion was acceptable to you and we await your confirmation in order that we may commission an artist for this design.

7 We look forward to receiving an early reply on all the points raised above.

Definitive Stamp Issue - Mail Vessels

The letter from Crown Agents dated 17th November is vertually as we decided at our last meeting. I am not sure whether a release in August is an alternative to the suggested 'split release' or whether the later release would still be in two parts? I think we should follow-up the 'split release' suggestion, especially if it would result in substantial additional revenue.

With one high value stamp it is impossible to arrange the 15 stamps on three First Day Covers, giving an equal face value. As I see it there are two possibilities - suggestion (a) is tidier in face value, while (b) is tidier thematically:

#### New Definitive

With regard to the face value of the new definitive, it merits my commenting that although you will have a £3 stamp in the new set to bring the total face value to £5.50 as recommended by Mr Vaughan this is roughly in line with my own recommendation. A set with a top value of £2 can easily have a total face value of £5-6 by including one or two more values of between 30p and 60p.

#### Recess

I note that you prefer not to defer the new definitive issue. We envisate no difficulty in matching the quality of the Turks & Caicos issue but you may like to know that, still thinking in terms of an intaglio issue, De La Rue the leading UK intaglio printers are at present working out a possible project for consideration by the American firm mentioned in my letter of 7 October.

14 m relume We refer to our letter of 23 August 1976 regarding the First Day Cover for the above stamp issue.

- 2 We should be grateful if you would advise whether you accept our suggestion that the First Day Cover design prepared by John Smith be used as a cancellation cachet. If so, it will be necessary to prepare a fresh first day cover design. If you decide to have three smaller First Day Covers with the values spread evenly, you may wish to have three separate designs to do with Mail Ships or perhaps one design printed in different colours for the three types of envelope, depending on whether the quantities involved make such a scheme viable.
- 3 It would be a simple matter to have one of our artists prepare a suitable design which would be submitted for your approval. Mr Smith may wish to draw up the design himself - I am sure that if he based the design on a ship of some sort, aiming to reproduce it in two or three colours the effect would be very good. If Mr Smith prepares finished artwork it would be convenient for it to be colour - separated as this makes the task of the die engraver so much easier.
- 4 We look forward to receiving your instruction regarding the cancellation cachet and First Day Covers.

1 am pleased to advise you that results of our tender for the production of the above issue by the litho process have now been received. are as follows:

- (a) Walsall Security Printers Cost £10,761.20 Delivery of proofs - 5 weeks Delivery of stamps after approval of proofs - 6/8 weeks.
- (b) Questa Colour Security Printers Cost £11,579 Delivery of Proofs - 4/6 weeks Delivery of stamps after approval of proofs - 8 weeks.
- John Waddington Cost £16,796.55 Delivery of proofs - 5 weeks Delivery of stamps after approval of proofs - 10 weeks.
- (d) - Harrison & Sons Cost £17,056.91 Delivery of proofs - 7 weeks Delivery of stamps after approval of proofs - 9 weeks.
- (e) Enschede Cost £19,703. Delivery of proofs - 8 weeks Delivery of stamps after approval of proofs - 9 weeks.

Offers were not received from Messrs De La Rue or Format Security Printers.

Messrs Walsall, Questa, Waddingtons and Enschede have quoted on the basis of 5 colours for each stamp which allows the reproduction of the basic design in four colour process with the silhouette of Her Majesty plus the border in a special colour. Messrs Harrisons' analysis is somewhat different and they would print eight of the values in five colours, with the remainder in six colours. In our view, however, there would be no particular advantage

The above offers allow for the production of the stamps, by the lithographic process based on the finished artwork we now hold. None of the printers consider it desirable to run an additional line work plate to clarify the rigging and other fine detail as this is already sufficiently clear on the artwork. We also feel that the additional working is unnecessary.

On the above figures, the contract should be placed with either Walsall or Questa. Walsall's offer the most favourable initial price - some £800 less than Questa, but a comparison between their respective reprint schedules puts a rather different complexion on the matter, assuming that at least one reprint will be required during the life of the issue :-

Thus, it is evident that, assuming average reprint quantities, the difference in the initial costs will be adequately covered if only three of four values are reprinted. Since in the life of a definitive reprints of four or more values must be anticipated we must recommend acceptance of Questa's offer rather than that of Walsall. There is little or no difference between the two as regards delivery.

Incidentally, we have discussed the question of a split release for this issue and have decided that demand for your stamps would not, after all, be greatly affected either way, so that it would now appear reasonable to release the whole issue on one date.

We note from your cable of 13 December your decision to have three moderate sized first day covers rather than one giant cover and that the design originally submitted by Mr Smith is to be adapted for use as a cancellation cachet. We will commission an artist to produce a new FDC design for your approval.

In giving you these quotations for an issue printed by the litho process, I have not overlooked the comments in your letter of 13 October last when you remarked on the number of countries who still produce high quality stamps using the recess process. The three you then cited are all major industrial countries whose printings are correspondingly large. The high origination cost of the recess process can be absorbed without more than marginal increase in overall costs. All three countries have facilities for printing by this process.

We ourselves have been following our own lines of enquiry. As I think you know, we consider that the design of your new definitive issue represents an ideal theme for recess printing. Our problem is to see how, with relatively small quantities, we could submit a proposition to you that would be financially acceptable when origination costs alone are likely to be roughly £100,000. However, the Franklin Mint who are handling one of the two large United States first day cover projects for the Silver Jubilee issue, are also looking for an expansion of the philatelic sales side of their operation. Against this background we have been discussing with them whether a recess issue could be negotiated where they would take sufficient quantities to make the project viable. If our discussions are successful the rewards would be large.

We know that Franklin are anxious to launch such a project early in 1978. They are also known to be discussing the matter in detail at their headquarters in the United States at present and we are expecting to hear something more from them in the near future. We will then report again.

Our purpose in telling you this is to give you the opportunity, if you so desire, of deferring production of the definitive and its subsequent release so that we may submit a more detailed proposition to you. We accept that what we are able to say so far is hardly sufficient to enable you to take a major decision, but it will I hope help to show that we are following this line actively.

I look forward to hearing whether you are willing to defer further progress on the definitive. If so, we can of course increase the print quantities for the next special issue, fixing the value to include any that may be in short supply locally.



Major Spafford was welcomed to the Meeting and he was asked to put forward the points that he wished to discuss.

- 1. Statement of Stamp Policy. Major Spafford thought that we should issue fairly soon a statement about our stamp policy in view of the recommendation contained in the Shackleton Report. Major Spafford said the Study Group would give this publicity.
- 2. Stamp Packs. Major Spafford thought that we should consider selling stamp packs which should increase sales and thereby the revenue of the Colony. Stamp Packs could contain a brief description of the issue i.e. designer, printer and other relevant details.
- 3. Major Spafford thought that we should keep commemorative stamps on sale in the Philatelic Bureau for up to one year. Being questioned on this, he thought that there would be no objection in philatelic circles to the sale of commemoratives by the Bureau after they had been withdrawn from sale, following their normal life span of three months. He also suggested that the Printing Office should produce a brochure which would help to promote sales.
- 4. Commission charge by Philatelic Bureau. On being questioned whether the charge levied by the Bureau was considered by philatelists as a deterrent to sales, Major Spafford said that although this may not be popular, there was no objection to continuing with this arrangement. Major Spafford also thought we should speed up the service provided by the Bureau; he realised the difficulties involved but was pleased that there was a full time operator now.
- 5. Major Spafford thought that we should consider providing a cup for the best exhibit of Falkland Islands Stamps at the International Stamp Exhibition in America and another cup for the best exhibit in the United Kingdom. Major Spafford thought that for an outlay of £100 this would go a long way to promoting sales and giving publicity to Falkland Islands Stamps. Such a scheme was used by other countries to promote sales.
- 6. Colony Stand at an International Exhibition. Major Spafford thought that we should consider having our own exhibition at some time in the future. He thought that we should endeavour to do this in 1980 when there would be an exhibition in London which would be convenient for the Study Group who would be prepared to man the stand and therefore the only cost to the Falkland Islands Government would be the hire of the stand.
- 7. Stamp Vending Machine. Major Spafford thought that we should consider the possibility of providing a stamp vending machine in order that people could purchase stamps outside the hours of bussiness of the Post Office. He thought that we should be able to buy reasonably cheaply a coil stamp machine and thereby provide a better service and increase sales of our stamps.

- 8. Major Spafford thought that if we are still having difficulties over producing the commemorative to celebrate the Opening of the Airport that we should consider overprinting our definitive issue. He even went so far as to say that it could be overprinted locally.
- 9. <u>New Issues</u>. Major Spafford hoped that we would not mind the Study Group submitting ideas from time to time of subjects for stamp issues. He had in mind the celebration of the centenary of the Kosmos shipping line which carried our mail; a lighthouse issue; and the issue of Christmas stamps.
- 10. Major Spafford next spoke about recess printing of our new definitive issue: he thought that this would be very welcome to Philatelists, but when pressed, could not give any estimate of the increase sales which would result from recess printing. It is estimated that recess printing is four times as expensive as other methods, but Major Spafford did not think that collectors would buy four times as many stamps, if the issue was recess printed. He thought it would be a good idea to have the three top values recess printed.
- 11. While on the subject of our definitive, Major Spafford thought that we should stagger the release thereby easing the burden on the collectors pocket.
- 12. Sale of FDCs After the Release Date. Major Spafford saw no objection to the sale of FDCs after the stamps were withdrawn from sale, even though this meant that dealers were often undersold by the Post Office.
- 13. The Stamp Committee had a very interesting discussion with Major Spafford on stamp matters in general, which confirmed that although such things as souvenir sheets brought the reputation of the Stamp issuing policy of the Falklands into question, it showed that there is a very fine line between distinguishing what is acceptable in the way of "gimmicks" and what is unacceptable to philatelists. In other words while such things as souvenir sheets were unacceptable, stamp packs, philatelic postal stationery such as several types of registered envelopes, and overprinting of stamps were apparently acceptable.
- 14. On the subject of Souvenir sheets, Major Spafford considered these detrimental to our image and their release resulted in black marks being awarded, as philatelists looked upon souvenir sheets as a means of extorting more money from philatelists. It was pointed out to Major Spafford that of some 36 countries advertised in the Crown Agents Stamp Bureau supplement, about 14 issues had souvenir sheets released by countries of repute whose reputations were apparently not harmed by the release of souvenir sheets.

In December a ceremony was held here to confer the Freedom of Stanley on the Royal Marines. It was decided by Executive Council before this that, to mark this occasion, the Marines should be presented eventually with the final art work of the definitive stamp issue, and this decision was endorsed by His Excellency the Governor. 3. I am afraid that we had assumed that the art work would automatically be returned to us and we could then present it to the Royal Marines. From recent correspondence however it emerges that this may not necessarily be the case, and I write now to ask if you will please note that as soon as you can release the final art work it is sent here so that we can make arrangements to send it on to the Commandant General of the Royal Marines. 4. As an alternative we should like to explore the possibility of having the art work suitably mounted in the UK and passed

over to the Marines direct from your office; if there is any merit in this and this is a practical suggestion perhaps you will kindly let me know.

5. Perhaps this is a suitable occasion to deal also with another matter that has exercised us for some time; I am anxious to compile a catalogue of all drawings, preliminary art work, final art work, sample stamps, relating to our issues. So that I may make this as complete as possible will it be asking too much of you to send me a list of such items retained on our behalf by the Crown Agents ?





NEW DEFINITIVE STAMP ISSUE

In Mr Sim's absence on tour in the Pacific I am writing to you concerning developments on the various proposals mentioned in his letter of the 11 March.

During my recent visit to the Franklin Mint in the USA it became apparent that whilst they still remain interested in doing a promotional project with recess definitive issue because of the very high cost concerned they consider it essential to mount the promotion with a major nation in the first instance and are now looking towards Great Britain and or a similar issuing authority.

In the circumstances I feel it would be unfair to Falklands to ask for any further deferment of their definitive issue whilst these negotiations continue.

I would therefore recommend that we now proceed with production on normal lines using the lithographic technique which Questa use and which, as you will have observed from the specimens sent to you earlier, gives an exceptionally fine result. In this way we would hope to complete production by approximately end August/early September and so offset some of the delay which has been incurred by the recent investigation into the possibilities of recess printing.

On a personal level after all the hard work and investigation that has been put into the project it is very disappointing to our host that we have come to a halt, especially since our most recent discussions with Bradbury.

You will be interested to know that we have already had preliminary discussions with Stanley Gibbons to do a special feature and promotion for the new definitive issue which subject to your approval we propose utilising approximately 250 sets of publicity stamps to support the promotion. This is on similar lines to the Silver Jubilee promotion which has proved so successful in increasing sales.

Thank you for your letter of 4 November. I am now able to comment on various points in that letter; on points contained in the earlier letter ref P&T/1/1 of 7 October from the Chief Secretary; and on outstanding points in my own letter to you of 7 October. As all three touch upon stamp matters I hope you will not mind my replying to both the Chief Secretary and yourself in one letter, rather than separately. I am however sending a copy of this reply to the Chief Secretary for his ease of reference.

### Number of Releases

If I may start with the Chief Secretary's letter. I find he made the point that if you release four issues a year you will have two sets of stamps on sale at all times. There can be no objection to this practice and indeed since releases can never be evenly spaced every 13 weeks there will be occasions when two commemorative issues are on sale with the definitive issue. This is quite normal, although it should be borne in mind that whereas the current definitive issue offers 15 values, commemorative issues contain no more than three or four values, only one of which need be for a value in common use. If you so wish you could release two issues at once: but doing so defeats the object of maintaining collectors' interest. It is unnecessary.

### 3 New Definitive

with regard to the face value of the new definitive, it merits my commenting that although you will have a £3 stamp in the new set to bring the total face value to £5.50 as recommended by Mr Vaughan this is roughly in line with my own recommendation. A set with a top value of £2 can easily have a total face value of £5-6 by including one or two more values of between 30p and 60p.

### 4 Souvenir Sheets

We have long been aware that some collectors dislike souvenir sheets. However, you may like to see the attached column in the current issue of the 'Philatelic Exporter'. This is essentially a trade journal but the commentator clearly implies that when souvenir sheets are well produced they increase sales dramatically.

### Quality of Issues

I turn now to your letter of 4 November. We believe that although purists tend to protest whenever they are displeased, their protests do not adversely affect sales. It may even be that the very publicity helps promote the issue.

#### American Sales

Some few years ago we felt with you that there was scope for increased sales in the USA and in conjunction with our Agent in North America, Stangib Ltd., we began to put considerable resources into developing this potential. As a result we have been the pioneers of a new and very large market there servicing 'collectors' rather than 'philatelists'. Collectors have a more general outlook often beyond stamps and philatelic material. It is from our work in this area that the Jubilee sales of up to 30,000 sets to the Franklin Mint come, and we have also gained a further order from a second marketing organisation who hope to sell up to 50,000 covers with the top two values of the Jubilee issue (33p and 11p) affixed.

We do have a very good idea of the kind of issues such organisations will be interested in and you can rest assured that we will be taking every opportunity to expand further and make sales of your issues when possible.

#### Bulletin

The possibility of reviving the Bulletin has been considered on numerous occasions. Unfortunately, at best its circulation was limited to about 10,000. The task of receiving and recording subscriptions and reminding when subscriptions had expired was extremely expensive. Our 'Gazette' in STAMP MONTHLY reaches 60,000 stamp collectors. We are also looking into the possibility of expanding circulation into another philatelic journal STAMP MAGAZINE, with a circulation upwards of 30,000. Negotiations and costings are in hand.

Action Areeded Lee (11) Stanley Gibbons tell us that after calculating their costs and potential sales they would require that you and we between us purchase 9,000 copies at publisher's price. This is because sales through the S.G. outlets are thought to be limited. For our part I estimate that we could sell 2,000 copies at exhibitions over a year or so. This means that the check list would be expensive but the expense represents sales of no more than 1,000 sets of the definitive. It merits consideration in that light. Certainly the list would be unique in that 1t would be the first to record stamps of a postal authority outside UK.

#### Recess

I note that you prefer not to defer the new definitive issue. We envisage no difficulty in matching the quality of the Turks & Caicos issue but you may like to know that, still thinking in terms of an intaglio issue, De La Rue the leading UK intaglio printers are at present working out a possible project for consideration by the American firm mentioned in my letter of 7 October.

Finally, may I say that although there are still a few points where I need to write to you again, I hope this letter will enable you and the Foreign & Commonwealth Office to make the public announcement on the lines of their September draft.

A NYONE still harbouring illusions about the difference between British and continental European philately need only to have visited the splendid four-day show at Essen at the beginning of November to have learned a stern lesson. To begin with, thanks to the favourable geographical situation of the show, its organizers were able to draw on a conurbation totalling 40 million people, and budgeted on an attendance of about 50,000 visitors, mininum. They got (if forecasts based on three days out of four were accurate) about 65,000. All paying their 3 Deutschemarks admission, and all clustering round the numerous trade stands, whose generously laid-out gangways (turned lato 'streets' named after famous collectors) were at times too narrow for the crowds.

No doubt about it: they came and they spent; dealers were more than satisfied with results, and the bourse (in a carefully guarded upstairs room) did good business, even if 90 percent of the table-holders were German. Visitors who arrived without the benefit of a table booking found plenty of clients, rest assured. And the secret of the success? Apart from the location in a pair of large exhibition halls on the outskirts of a major industrial halls on the outskirts of a major industrial city, without doubt the recognition by the organizers that not only are agencies representing postal administrations here to staythey are also eager to provide attractive displays, to take stand space, and to take an active part in the exhibition. So there were nearly forty countries with individual stands, represented either direct, or via their local trade delegations, embassies, consulates, or other dealers who supply the collectors.

'Passports' franked with stamps from the participating countries (each stand had to be visited, the stamp bought-unit price | Dmand the cancellation obtained) were a thoroughgoing success. One enterprising merchant pre-pared a stock of 500 at 57.50 Dm. each, and watched them being swallowed by the crowds who took his mathematics to heart. A poster proclaimed that if each stamp meant only 10 minutes queueing time, the collector would spend the whole of a six-hour day just filling his passport. Staff were kept busy selling stamps, affixing and cancelling them, but, above all, thousands of collectors were kept moving through the exhibition, going from stand to stand, taking-in the message, and buying, buying, buying. The German post office did not issue a special stamp for the event, but it provided four cancellations, two devoted to the I.F.S.D.A. as sponsors. Crowds beseiged the Federal p.o. sales points from opening till closing time, with never less than a dozen, and often a hundred people clustered around, getting their covers stamped, buying new issues, or subscribing to the standing-order service. In fact the stands which were least crowded were those offering rare and classical material: this does not mean that they did badly—simply that the crowd interest was with the pretty new issues, and small wonder.

third huge hall was devoted to exchange and swop clubs: there must have been up to a thousand people sitting at the long trestles all the time, swapping, trading, and moving from stand to stand. It was quite amazing, and, I fear, a signal demonstration to all organizers of stamp shows in the U.K.: the message was loud and clear—get them in with new issues, with bright topical material, and get the official bodies to shoulder as much of the financial burden as possible.

SMALL wonder the G.B. Charity stamp scheme turned out to be a fiasco: there was too little morey involved, and the whole ex-periment was handled from the beginning in the spirit of 'let's give them their stamp, it's the spirit of 'let's give them their stamp, it's bound to fall flat, and that will shut them up for good and all'. In this, the British post office was undoubtedly correct. It was a failure, and I suppose it has shut 'them' up. As it happened, the Charity stamp sales arrangements were ludicrously inefficient, and the results was a company to a net loss as even the results were as near to a net loss as even official mathematics will admit. I mention this more in sorrow than in anger. At Essen I picked up a glossy booklet, entitled Stamps which Aid—25 Years of German Charity Stamps. For the statistically minded, the idea of charity stamps was rooted in Germany as long back as 1919 with war victims surcharges on the Germania design, having been inspired by the British Q.V. Jubilee labels of 1897. In the post-World War II period under review, the statistics are remarkable. The 1949 sets raised 580,000 Dm. for charity, cost I Dm. to buy, and now trade at 200 Dm. each; enough incentive here for even the most sluggish philatelist or philanthropist! From this beginning, sales dropped back to 350,000 Din. in , but climbed back again to 565,000 Dm. in 1952, reaching a staggering 14 million Dm. in 1973-4. These figures are the proceeds of the charity surcharges only: the German post office collected a multiple of these sums each time. Topics included helpers of mankind, fairy tales, toys, dolls, and so forth: all unsensational-none of it a runaway topic in the space, Olympics, or royalty league, but, each time, a steady and attractive, positively-oriented theme.

#### Can't keep off it!

THE subject of charity, I mean. Also seen, whilst in Essen was a neatly produced leaflety asking for used stamps for one particular charity. Nothing new in that. I could name TINALLY, you, without pausing to think, a dozen British organizations that ask their supporters to 'save their stamps' and forward them in bulk to the appropriate department, for processing and resale. Now comes one idea which I have not heard of being operated in any of the English-speaking countries so far. One German charitable organization, having obtained its stamps, arranges for the washing, sorting and sale ('Your wants lists filled, if you are prepared to wait') to be done by patients: presumably long-term invalids in various hospitals. The customer's patience is requested "because our sick colleagues are not capable of so much, and because the com-position of the staff changes so rapidly and always unexpectedly"—and also because the "knowledge necessary for this specialized work" cannot be acquired in a hurry.' Proceeds of the sale of such stamps apparently support no less than eight nursing sisters in East Africa. Perhaps it's already being done in England too, but I had never heard of it.

#### Always a new angle


IT is perhaps necessary, writing in a trade paper, to comment on an exhibition purely in.


terms of number of stand-holders, amount of business done, success or otherwise in numbers of cash-laden customers passing through the turnstiles, et al. And whilst on the subject, I must mention that I did hear one young lady at Essen asking her escort in tones of the utmost and sweetest reason "Well, now that you've spent all your money, why can't we go home?". But stamp exhibitions do hove another raison d'etre: it is, you will agree, the exhibition of stamps. Have I mentioned the enormous hall full of (principally) the most carefully arranged offerings by hundreds of collectors, also well visited, if not by such crowds as the halls where everything on display was for sale or exchange? From the brief glance which was all I could afford (to walk past all the displays, glarking at each sheet for ten seconds, would probably have taken four full days), I registered only the briefest, most casual impression; that the official displays were all, without exception, a handful of colourful recent sets arranged on sheets with virtually no writing-up; and that there were very few sixty-eight shades of the Id. blue of 1502' type exhibits. Postal history predominated everywhere, lovingly assembled solicitously described, telling of explorations into the past of the post 'where no man had trod before.' One of the most amusing was 'The letter as a menns of communication' which ranged from Babylonian cumiform clay tablets to Greek papyrus fragments and cul-minated (via more modern items) in a wooden dagger thrust through a scrap of paper saying 'Beware, the hour of doom is nigh' (or words to that effect) which the exhibitor claimed he had found in his letter box some five or six years ago. Last (and definitely least) item in this exhibit was an empty page indicating that though letters have travelied from Earth to the Moon, the exhibitor had not been able to afford one when they first came on the market (then at Dm. 10,000) and that now the price had risen to Dm. 14,000 but even at that price there were none available for purchase, Maybe this will set a fashion in exhibition entries for the future? 'Here I should have shown the top value in the set, but it was either the stamp or getting the carpets cleaned, and the carpets won', and so forth. Perhaps classes could be established for 'low cost collections' and it might be no bad thing if the top prizes went to displays which scored high on originality, ingenuity, and making the most of whatever is to hand.

FINALLY, and very much on the level of 'honour where honour is due', I don't think anyone has yet mentioned in print the enhanced appearance and contents of souvenir sheets as recently issued under the auspices of the Crown Agents. As originally envisaged, and still produced in hundreds annually, souvenir sheets merely reproduce or recapitulate stamps also issued in normal sheet form, sometimes with a decorative border. Recent C.A. productions (and I commend the Gilbert Islands 'Armour', the Jamaica Belisario prints, and the Seychelles Control of the stamps and the Seychelles of the stamps and the Seychelles. Ornithological Congress items, amongst many others) include substantial amounts of writingup, and expand the story of the issue in a way which could never be accommodated in the normal postage stamp format. By these means, not only does the client country virtually double its sales income, it is also enabled to spread the message, whether artistic, ornithological or plain publicity-seeking, to collectors who presumably do look at these things with care and absorb what is written

I trust, at least, that the designers engaged by the Crown Agents will avoid such errors as I saw on the Tonga 'German Treaty Centennial' issue, which omitted the second 'I' in Emperor Wilhelm's name, and (possibly) misspelled King Tupou ('Tuobou?') as well.

NEW DEFINITIVE STAMP ISSUE

Thank you for your letter of 7 February agreeing to delay your new definitive stamp issue pending results of our negotiations on the possibility of its being printed by the Recess process. As might be expected with a project of this nature, we have made less progress than we had hoped.

We have pursued two avenues of investigation. Firstly we have examined the possibility of producing two variants of the Recess process. De La Rue have made a considerable effort on our behalf and we enclose their 'essays' with an explanatory appendix. Unfortunately, when these detailed proposals were subsequently discussed by the DLR senior management, it was decided that now was not the opportune time for the firm to re-enter the Recess stamp market after a period of producing currency notes and Lithographic stamps only. Reluctantly they have dropped out of the project.

The task then facing us was to find an alternative printer. We first approached Harrison & Sons, who have printed a number of Recess issues with Gravure backgrounds, but where the Recess content was fairly elementary. Regretfully they decided their technology is not sufficiently advanced. At the same time, we opened discussions with Bradbury Wilkinson, who are even now evaluating their participation in such a project. We hope to have an initial policy reaction from them within the next week. If their reaction is negative, the only other practical option is Enschede of Holland.

However, if Bradbury's response is favourable, we consider the best arrangement would be for the plates to be prepared by an independent engraver and for the steel originals to be handed to Bradbury's for printing the Recess element of the design. If necessary, another printer could handle the Litho backgrounds needed to give a more attractive appearance. One designer we

particularly have in mind is C Z Slania, a freelance engraver working in Sweden, who has designed many of the attractive Swedish Recess stamps.

Turning to the second aspect of the project, one of my colleagues is already in the United States and will be visiting the Franklin Mint within the next few days for further discussions on their promotional proposals. Much depends on the outcome of this meeting, since Franklin's participation is an essential factor in offsetting the very high costs of such an issue.

We appreciate that we must make a firm recommendation to you by the end of March, preferably by outlining a reasonably firm proposal. I will then write to you again without fail.

#### APPENDIX

The essays show three approaches to the design, each using four papers and thus giving a total of twelve alternatives.

Of the four different types of paper:

- 1. TR4 is the standard coated De La Rue stamp paper.
- 2. BANKNOTE paper is an unwatermarked rag paper of high quality but uncoated.
- 3. ART paper is a rather thicker highly calendered (very shiny) coated paper used for high quality colour brochures, etc.
- 4. 2 CHECK is a thinner standard quality uncoated paper.

Of the three different printing processes:

#### 1. DIE PROOFING

This is a Recess process giving an extremely high quality result, probably better even than that of the 'classic' Falklands issues. Stamps cannot be set closely in sheets as for coventional stamps.

#### 2. ETCH PLATE

Etch plate is essentially another method of transferring an image from the original steel plate into coventional sheets of stamps. It gives a slightly lower quality result but, except to an expert, a magnifying glass is necessary to show the difference.

#### 3. LITHO

By comparison with the Recess printed versions, the Litho essays show less tonal variation.

Although these essays are now of academic interest only, in that De La Rue have withdrawn from the project, they show the quality of result we would expect to obtain from any other Recess printer.

Please return the essays when you no longer require them.



In addition to the above comments, special attention should be paid to all the flags to ensure colours are correct and to the rigging.

You will notice from our letter of 19 January that it was intended for ease of printing that the silhouette of Her Majesty and the border should be printed in a special colour. By some oversight, however, this has occurred on only the following values:-

2p, 3p, 8p, 9p and 25p.

The silhouettes on the remaining values all take on shades of blue/grey/green of the sky or sea in each case as in fact was originally intended and in my opinion this gives a better effect than having the silhouette in the border colour.

I suggest that if any changes are made in the silhouette colour, they should be made on the 2p, 8p and 9p values where perhaps the silhouettes could also take on shades of the sea if so desired.

You will by now have received my telegrams of 6 and 12 July regarding the proposal of five First Day Covers each depicting mail ships. If you are in agreement with this idea, we have a potential customer for a quantity of 3000 of each of the five covers. I look forward to receiving your comments on this proposal together with your comments on the proofs enclosed.

Thank you for allowing me to look at the Bromides of the new definitive stamp issue on which I would like to offer the following remarks:-

#### ORAVIA

Would it not be better to put P.S.N.C. or P.S.N.C. Line on the stamp instead of ORAVIA. The name of the ship would almost certainly cause comment if it appeared with the dates 1900-1917 as it does on the bromides, as the ORAVIA sank on the Billy Rock in 1912. She is really a representitive of the ships of the Pacific Steam Navigation Company which carried the Mails between 1900-1917.

#### MEMPHIS

Here again I feel it would be beeter to put KOSMOS LINE instead of MEMPHIS, as MEMPHIS only called on a few occasions at Stanley, being one of **REMEMPH** several ships of the KOSMOS line which carried the Mails between 1880-1900.

Please refer to your letter H1/FALK IS 3/01739/1 of 20 July. We agree all the comments relating to the individual issues as set out in your letter, but would ask you to take account of the following additional comments:



- As regards the silhouette of Her Majesty we believe that those on the 3p and 25p may remain as indicated, but that those on the 2p, 8p and 9p should be changed to be in the same shade as the sky. This would mean that the silhoustte on the complete set matched the background sky and/or sea.
- To assist you in appreciating our general view we find the 50p stamp ideal. The shading, liveliness and registration seem to be near perfect. We are also very much attracted to the £3 stamp.
- Generally we believe that, where the lettering does not show up clearly, it would be wise to lighten the colour of the sea, so long as this dose not detract from the overall effect.

- 5. We endorse your opinion concerning those stamps (notably the 2p, 8p and 10p) where the background colour is too vivid and the nimbus a little too sharp. The printing of the rigging on all stamps is good neither over strong nor too light. On all the stamps it should remain as in the proofs.
- 6. The proofs are returned herewith. We are returning the artwork under separate cover.



Thank you for your letter P&T/2/13 of 15th August about the proposal for John Smith to issue a limited edition of first day covers.

I can see no possible objection to this proposal, but there are two small points you may like to bear in mind:

- 1. From the way you write I infer, perhaps wrongly, that this is a private venture with the artist retaining in full the proceeds from the sales he makes and committing himself only to two items of expense, apart from publicity. Those two items are the purchasing of the stamps at face value, and the purchasing of suitable covers, a relatively small proportion of the selling price, leaving the artist rather than Government with a sizeable profit.
- 2. In the publicity, credit for the design will be given to John Smith, but the words "adapted by Granger Barrett" will need to be added. Mr. Smith should not, I suggest, claim sole credit. If he were to do so he could be accused of misleading his customers.





Thank you for your letter of the 9th September of re signed FDCs for the new definitive Mail Ships stamps. As you say the Crown Agents reply is not terribly helpful but I feel that that the problems presented can be overcome.

- My proposal is that if people wish me to sign the Official First Day Covers, then I will be prepared to do so at £25.00 per set of five, up to a limit of 250 sets.
- As I understand that the Device on the Eirst Day Covers is to be based on a design which I prepared and submitted-and incidentally for which mention of payment has never been made- I feel that I can claim that the Official First Day Covers can be classed as suitable covers. I did also suggest a colour scheme to be used.
- I will only be signing the Covers in as the artist of the original paintings, not the adaptor. Although Granger Barrett was responsible for the layout and the excellent Frames it should be remembered that we have requested that most of the other adaptions which he did should be removed,

i.e. going back to the artists original colours; lightening the sea again; taking away his rather oddly coloured skies in some instances; replacing the correct colours in some of the flags.

Thank you for your letter Hl/Falkland Islands 3/01739 dated 30th August 1977, the contents of which I have conveyed to Mr Smith.

- 2. Mr Smith takes the point about the credit to be accorded to Mr Granger Barrett, but is inclined to the view that as his was the original artwork, for which he was commissioned by this government, there could be no objection to his procuring a limited number of FDCs and merely signing them; and frankly I can see no legal impediment to this. Naturally we should like to retain some of the income from this source, although it is probably fair and equitable that Mr Smith is allowed to make something out of the venture. I think all I can do, therefore, is to reiterate to Mr Smith that he may expose himself to an accusation of misleading his customers if he does not add the words "adapted by Granger Barrett", although again on strictly legal interpretation it is difficult to see how we can dictate to him over this if he merely means to obtain some FDCs and virtually sell his signature on them.
- 3. Perhaps you would be kind enough to take another look at this proposal and tell me if there is any legal consideration that I have overlooked. If there is, I am sure Mr Smith would want to be the first to be informed as he is not the sort of person to wish to offend against the law in any way.

Please refer to your telegram of 31st October about the future policy of the affixing of stamps to FDCs.

- 2. This isn't an easy one to answer as the Postmaster cannot undertake this unless he has the stamps and covers here in good time to enable his team to undertake the work. As you know only too well we always seem to be involved in a last minute rush to get the issue on sale. I suppose we must share some of the blame for this for not getting material to you quickly enough or giving you the 18 months you would like. Another inhibiting factor is the lack of a speedy sea mail service by which we can get FDCs here. I, personally, give stamp matters praority but difficulties do arise from time to time.
- 3. I think the best thing to do is not to commit ourselves at this stage and hope that we can in future undertake the affixing of stamps here. This is theoretically the best plan as it means a part time job for a team and keeps money within the Colons.





I have shown John Smith who undertook the original drawings for the definitive issue, the colour prints from Questa. You will recall that we sent you a very hasty telegram on 17th November about the 9p, the 50p, the £1, and £3 stamps in case it was possible to make some further alterations.

Mr. Smith had had a further good look at the colour proofs comparing them with his original designs and has the following comments to make:-

- the hull should be checked against the original painting; 10
- the sky still looks unnatural;
- the background should be left as it is; it does not need to be any more mauve than it is already on the stamp proof. The flag is a Dutch flag and not French as indicated;
- the sea should be matched against the original painting; 5p
- 8p sky still looks unnatural, the red in the waterline and flag should match the original painting;
- the overall heavy green aspect should be removed.

The general comment of Mr. Smith is that it would have been better to ad here to the colours in the original paintings instead of altering them.

I realise that it is now too late to do anything about this but I pass these comments to you as naturally Mr. Smith still has a deep interest in the issue and wishes them to be as perfect as possible.



A brief chronological history of discovery and adventure might prove useful, as a preface to this beautiful series of mailships that have visited the Falkland Islands.

The first touch by a European explorer with the Falkland Islands was recorded by Amerigo Vespucci in 1502, when three Portuguese ships were blown off course into the path of the islands. By 1501, a group of islands to the east of Patagonia began to appear on cartographer's works.

Sebastian Cabot's maps depicted seven islands just north of "Baya de San Julian." This map, though published in 1544 was referred to in 1498 via a Spanish State Paper.

By 1550, this group of islands was known to Spanish, Portuguese, and English navigators. Drake, during his journey (1557-80) charted some "islands."

Then on to Sir Thomas Cavendish with the "Leicester" and John Davis with the "Desire" in 1591 and we enter the "black and white" era of sighting, landings, and mapmaking that surrounded the Falkland Islands.

Sir Richard Hawkins in 1594, Captain Sebald de Werert on the "Geloove" in 1598 and on and on. The Falkland Islands have been a haven for the weary Seaman and a home to the many British settlers who came to form and raise sheep.

#### "Hebe"

British brig of 189 tons arrived at Port Louis on the East Falklands on January 15th 1842 under the command of Capt. C. F. Anderson. Brought out Lieut Governor Moody to take over command of the Falkland Islands from the last Naval Officer in Charge - Lieut John Tyssen R. N. Hebe carried the Mails to and from the Colony on several occasions from 1812 until 1846.

#### "Nautilus"

British 500 ton Naval Transport on charter carried Mails passengers and stores for the Falklands during the years 1846 to 1848. On her last call at Stanley on June 1848 she brought out Governor Ronnie with his family and sailed for London on July 15th taking away the former Governor, Capt. Moody.

#### "Amelia"

The first vessel of the Falkland Islands Company. Arrived at Stanley on July 1st 1852 rigged as a brigantine and was shortly re-rigged as a schooner schooner. Carried the Mails from 1852 until 1854 in consequence of which the postage between England and the Colony was reduced from two shillings and seven pence to one shilling per half ounce by the "New Packet Service".

## "Fairy"

Schooner of about 75 tons: First arrived at Stanley 31st July 1854 and spent 24 years Trading, Sealing and Wricking between Falklands and Patagonia with several voyages on charter to the Government to carry the Mails to and from Montevideo between 1857-1861.

Was named "Rachel P. Brown" on arrival at Stanley: name changed during Sept. 1854. Tonnage also changed over the years from 107 to 70 tons.

On first arrival at Stanley was 71 days out from New York and Montevideo having called there to pick up the Mails for the Colony.

On 16th October 1874 brought into Stanley the Crews of the British barques, ADMIRAL FITZROY and MOSS TROOPER both vessels having burnt off the Horn.

## "Foam"

Schooner of 88 tons built at Portsmouth during 1848 for Lord Dufferin. Purchased in 1863 by the Government of the Falkland Islands for use as the Mail Schooner between the Islands and Montevideo until the end of 1872 during which time she made 59 return voyages: all with mishap. Then purchased by Andreas Pitaluga for inter-island use until May 1890 when she was wrecked on Carcass Island in a great gale following thick fog.

#### "Black Hawk"

Schooner of 110 tons arrived at Stanley November 20th 1872. Sixty-two days from London with crew of eight and eight passengers. Captain J. Campbell. Carried the Colony mail to and from Montevideo from January 1873 until 1880.

#### "Memphis"

An iron screw steamer of 946 tons owned by the Company of Deutsche Dampfschiffart Gesellschaft KOSMOS at Hamburg. Built at Hartlepool, England during 1872 by Alexander Withy. Ships of the KOSMOS line carried mails to and from the Falklands from 1880 until July 1st 1900.

#### "Gravia"

Steel twin screw steamer of 5374 tons built in 1897 by Harland & Wolf for the Pacific Steam Navigation Company which held the Mail Contract for the Colony from 1900-1917. Steamers of this Company called at Stanley on the outward and homeward voyages to and from Valparaiso or Callao. ORAVIA was wrecked on the Billy Rock in Port William at the Falkland Islands during the night of November 12th 1912. No lives were lost.

#### "s.s. Falkland"

Steel Steamer built in 1906 by the Ailsa Shipbuilding Co. as the "WHEATSHEAF". Arrived at Stanley 5th February 1914. Carried mail and cargo until January 1934. Made voyages to Montevideo, Punta Arenas - once to South Georgia in 1929, and finally to Magellanes where she was sold. Renamed "TERESA" and registered at Valparaiso. 452 tons. 152 ft long. 24.9 ft. beam. Ltrs HGRF.

## "Fleurus"

Steel screw steamer of 406 tons. Built at Savannah during 1919. Chartered by the Falkland Islands Government from the Als Tonsbergs livalfangeri (Whaling Co.) in 1924 for Mail Service to the Dependencies and later to Montevideo, as well as to South Georgia. Made occasional voyages with the mails to Punta Arenas. Left the Colony service in July 1933.

## "Lafonia"

Steamer of 1961 gross tons. Constructed during 1911 by the Greenock & Grangemouth Dockyard Co., at Grangemouth as the "DOROTHY" which was changed later to "Southern Coast" and to "LAFONIA" in 1936 when bought by the Falkland Islands Company: arrived at Stanley on December 29th that year. Served in the Colony with a Mail and cargo service to Montevideo and Punta Arenas with occasional voyages to Brazil, South Georgia and Europe. Requisitioned for War Service in 1941. Finally sank after a collision in the North Sea during 1942.

## "Fitzroy"

First arrived at Stanley as the "LAPONIA", 344 tons, November 9th 1931. Name changed to "FITZROY" between September 26th and October 24th 1936; prior to arrival on December 29th 1936 of a new LAPONIA of 1091 tons. Carried mails and cargo inter-islands, Montevideo, South Georgia and Grahamland until 1957. During 1949 was converted to oil burning and lengthened which increased cargo capacity by 20%.

#### "Merak"

One of six Dutch/motor vessels chartered by the Falkland Islands Company between 1951 and 1953 to carry cargo and mails between the United Kingdom and the Falkland Islands. Built in 1949 by N. V. Schpsw. Gebr. van der Werf at Deest, for N. V. Nan Nievelt Goodriaan & Co's Stoomv. Matts. 491 tons.

#### "Darwin"

Constructed during 1956-57 by the Goole Shipbuilding and Repairing Company. Arrived at Stanley August 3rd 1957 and maintained a monthly mail service between Stanley and Montevideo with mid winter voyages to South Georgia, occasional calls to Punta Arenas and once to Comodoro Rivadavia. Withdrawn from service by her owners, The Falkland Islands Co, Ltd., and finally sailed from the Colony under Greek ownership in September 1973. Gr. tonnage 1973. Length 240 ft. Beam 40ft. British Flag

## "A.E.S."

Danish motor vessel of 947 tons built at Svendborg, Denmark in 1957 and chartered by the Falkland Islands Co. for trade between the United Kingdom and the Colony. Owned by A. E. Sorenson, whose initials make up her somewhat unusual name. Arrived first at Stanley on December 16th 1957 and contineud to make four calls each year with mails and cargo until 1974.



#### DEFINITIVE STAMP ISSUE: FALKLAND ISLANDS

As you know, the current successful definitive stamp issue does not have an llp value to cover the basic airmail letter. To some extent this does not really matter. The gap can be covered either by doubling two or more of the values or, more profitably, by ensuring that all the commemorative issues have such a value.

- 2. But it has occurred to me that we might profitably fill this gap in due course by making use of the one mail boat which we have not used; that is, the charter boat now in use, the "Annette Danielson".
- 3. I write now, therefore, to ask three basic questions:
  - a) Is this feasible and, if so, when?
  - b) Would it be acceptable in philatelic terms? and
  - c) Would it be worth while in commercial terms?
- 4. If your replies are affirmative, then we ought to start preparations before too long.

2 We like the idea of the use of the "Annette Danielson" as the subject for this additional value. 

#### SHIP ISSUE

The ship issue has been acclaimed as a splendid issue for which the Crown Agents are due a large amount of the acclamation for the care and thought that was put into making the issue one we can justifiably be proud of.

It has been drawn to our attention, however, that the name Falkland Islands and the value should be more distinct. The Post Office staff have also made this point as they are finding it difficult to distinguish some of the values as the background colouring is too similar.

The purpose of this letter is to seek your comments on the propriety of changing the design so that the name and value are more distinct. I am aware that this would entail the expense of artists fees, printing expenses etc. There would also be the criticism that we were exploiting the collector by changing an issue. You may recall the change of the £1 stamp of the previous BAT definitive issue caused eyebrows to rise; and the decimal-overprinting of our previous definitive followed later by a decimal tablet generated some criticism, as collectors said they were forced into buying two additional sets to make their collection complete.

John Smith, who prepared the designs for the definitive, thinks that the name and value need making bolder and has submitted a cover with the name picked out in gold and black which I attach. Perhaps you would be good enough to give this some thought and let us know what you think about the wisdom of making the name and value more distinct. A time for a change would be when a reprint was needed as long as it with not too close!



Your emorandum dated 13th inst. refers.

Originally I was the prime, and possibly the only, supporter of an 11p stamp in our New Definitive Stamp Issue. However the Stamp Committee decided otherwise and I now fully agree with their decision. With the current denominations we can 'make-up' any rate above 10p by utilising a varied combination of 2 or more stamps = 1 14p. In fact I find that people are doing just this to send their friends a variety of our new stamps. One week they use a 1p and 10p. the next a 2p and 9p etc. etc. I think the introduction of an 11p will spoil this very attractive set. As Crown Agents point out "Annette Danielsen" will be out of sequence and after all the "Anette Danielson" is only one of five vessels that have been chartered since the withdrawel of "A.E.S.". Further more postal rates will fluctuate without a doubt and in a year or two the 11p stamp will be superflous and we will be back to 'square one". It is our policy to keep abreast of changing postal rates with our commemorative issues.

- The Committee noted that there had been considerable criticism of this otherwise nuch-praised issue on the grounds that the values and the Colon's name were difficult to read on certain stamps. The Postmaster mentioned that for practical handling performance his staff had encountered such problems. It was therefore agreed that the Crown Agents should be sounded about the propriety and acceptability of slightly varying the design at the time of re-printing to see whether this fault could be overcome. The Committee are conscious of the fact that this could be held to be tampering with the design, but nonetheless agreed to seek expert guidance on this matter. If it were to be acceptable, due publicity to the change would have to be given and it would certainly mean an increase in the sales for this issue.
  - The Chairman advised the Committee that he had already sought advice from the Crown Agents about the feasibility of introducing one further stamp into this series, featuring the "Annette Danielsen", if an increase in international airmail rates made the requirement for another stamp desirable It was noted that the insertion of the "Annette Danielsen" would break the sequence.

Your letter P&T/2/13 of 10 April to Mike Vaughan has been passed to me to answer.

- 2 Quite frankly I would think that to change the designs even to the small extent proposed would be most unwise and could damage your philatelic reputation.
- 3 As you know there is a small but vociferous minority of collectors already who are always willing to carp at any deviation however insignificant from what they consider the path of purity. I would think that to change your definitive issue at an early stage would cause a storm of justified, if self-righteous, indignation among collectors.
- 4 It could be argued by them that the reasons for the change are either invalid or show a lack of foresight on all our behalves as a definitive issue is carefully planned over a period of years rather than months.
- 5 I would therefore recommend that you do not change the designs so soon after the date of issue. This is particularly important should a reprint become necessary for the planned booklet for this year. However perhaps we might reconsider this subject again when a decision is taken with regard to the proposal to introduce an 11p value, which Mr Oldry in his letter of 29 March suggested might be released in January 1979.
- 6 Hopefully after a little while the postal staff will become more familiar with the designs and the need for a change will recede.

I was in touch with you recently to ask whether you might be interested in designing an additional stamp for the current definitive issue to feature the "Annette Danielsen".

- 2. This project has now been carefully considered by the Stamp Advisory Committee and I am sorry to have to tell you that the idea has been abandoned. That news will, I know, be a disappointment to you so I am sorry to have to tell you also that the Grown Agents have offered compelling and cogent reasons for our not changing the basic design of the definitives by improving the titling and values.
- 3. Your own reservations about these points of design are, I think, widely held but to make any change at such an early stage would, at best, suggest a serious oversight by everyone concerned in the long planning of the issue. Even more important, it would, we are led to understand, also invoke considerable (and justified criticism from philatelists. In the circumstances the Committee felt bound to accept the advice of our professional Consultants and leave the issue unchanged.
- 4. But now for some more positive news. The Committee are interested in the possibility of building upon the undoubted success of these fine stamps, and your own contribution to that success, by issuing some stamps featuring the wrecks that are such a notable feature of the Islands. At this stage it is no more than a germ of an idea, and I wonder how it might strike you.
- 5. If you agree that it is an idea worth pursuing and if you yourself would eventually like to prepare designs for it, may I first invite you to subscribe some ideas both on how the stamps could be presented; what ships they might feature; and how many there might be? Once these proposals have been submitted, a policy decision could be taken on the project. But at this stage I ought to emphasise that the Committee is making a purely exploratory approach entirely without commitment.

Thank you very much for your letter of 3rd. May.

I shall publish your letter of 1st. May in the next issue of The Upland Goose, because it says so well the points which need to be brought out.

I am most interested in what you say about the Mailship Definitives. I understand the criticism and it is a very valid point. I anticipate that a reprint of the definitives will be required fairly soon in view of the demand and rapid sales. Presumably when the Crown Agents placed the initial order for printing, this was based on at least a years supply and yet, already, they have had to withdraw fairly substantial stocks from the Post Office.

May I suggest two things to avoid any criticism of a fund-raising ploy; the first is that I would like to have permission to publish in The Upland Goose, that it is under consideration to change the lettering and value plate on reprint, stating the very valid reasons. Secondly I would suggest that the reprints with the amended lettering and values be issued piecemeal as and when reprints are required, rather than make a complete reissue of the whole set at one go. In this way, I think that you will avoid completely any criticism of a ploy to fill the coffers to overflowing, and I am sure that we should support you, and even encourage our members to purchase the reprint. I would go so far as to offer to write a small piece for some of the commercial journals explaining why the change had been made, coming from us it has more validity in the eyes of some philatelists - or shall I say it adds to the validity.

I am very pleased to see the Mailships printed on the Aerogrammes. I expect that you will not be entirely satisfied with the result, although I think it improves on looking a second and third time; I wonder if the result would be improved if the black border was eliminated and also the perforations eut out? One of our members is starting to write a series of articles on Falkland Islands Aerogrammes and the first part will appear in the June issue of The Upland Goose. In my experience this can but encourage the collecting of these as a subject in their own right, like Formula Registered Envelopes, and presumably this is a fairly cheap way of the Post Office earning additional revenue, but, of course, you will make more money out of stamped Aerogrammes than Formula Registerd Envelopes.

I am forwarding separately at printed paper rate two magazines in which articles of mine have been published. The article in Stamp Collecting Weekly is in three parts, I hope, on subsequent weeks. In this way it should help to keep the publicity going over a longer period of time and attract more sales. I have forwarded my article on the Centenary of the First Falkland Islands Stamps to Gibbons Stamp Monthly and that should be published in August or September to coincide with the first day of issue. I understand that Bradbury Wilkinson are also submitting an article on the issue to Stamp Collecting Weekly.

I am very sorry that the KOSMOS issue for 1980 has been rejected: following encouragement from your predecessor both I and John Cooter spent quite a bit of time, and he spent some money, on producing the designs, but, of course, we are aware of the risks of prospecting issues. I think that it would be a nice gesture if the Crown Agents could ask him to design a specific issue for you.

Many thanks for your letter of 18 May and also for your kindness in having sent me the two magazines. Your efforts to keep the Falkland Islands in the collectors eye are much appreciated. Just how valuable a financial asset our stamps are has become all the more clear recently when we have been preparing our Budget.

Your letter dealt with a variety of points, not all of which I shall be dealing with in this interim reply. My object in writing now is to get an acknowledgement away before the post closes today, really to say that I reluctantly cannot take up your offer to write a piece about possible changes in the reprint of the current Definitive issue. To my own chagrin we received unequivocal and robust advice from the Crown Agents that we should not tamper in any way with the format of this issue. The Stamp Committee felt, therefore, that it could not ignore specialist guidance of this sort and the whole matter has been dropped. This I find disappointing, for I would have liked to have seen the issue improved and still more the sound of the tills ringing.

I shall be in touch with you about the other points that you have raised in due course. But this may not be for some time as we will shortly be plunged into the extended sudget session of Legislative Council which will take virtually all my time.

Thank you for your letter of 13th June.

The suggestion that we should look at the possibility of adding an additional stamp to the Mail Ships definitive issue has been abandoned because the Stamp Advisory Committee felt that it would be an unwarranted intrusion that would spoil an otherwise attractive set. In any case the vessel chosen would have been out of sequence, and the postage rate we were considering - 11p air mail rate - is catered for in our commemoratives or by a combination of other stamps.

We have also decided to accept your advice not to change the design of the definitive even when a reprint is necessary.
