Sir,

Proposed Empire Stamp Exhibition.

It is proposed to organise a public exhibition of postage stamps of the British Empire under the same auspices as the successful London Stamp Exhibition held last year. The Exhibition would take place in London some time during the winter of 1930–31, and would naturally attract entries from collectors of British Colonial stamps everywhere.

In order, however, to secure the maximum public interest in the undertaking, it is desired to secure the active co-operation of the Colonial Governments and Departments.

My object in approaching you on the matter is to ascertain whether your Office would be prepared to give official support to the exhibition to the extent of recommending the Colonial Governments under its jurisdiction to furnish exhibits of their stamps for display at the exhibition.

I need hardly point out that an exhibition of Empire stamps on the scale projected would constitute an original and by no means negligible form of Imperial propaganda, and I trust that for this reason you will accord the proposal your mature consideration.
