An alternative suggestion is the Outfloor Foreman of Works, but there are objections to this arrangement; the chief being that he would often have to leave the wotkmen during working hours to visit and allot banks.

The duties will often require to be undertaken out of the working hours, frequently on Saturday afternoons and even on Sundays, as these are the days when the householders are free.

2. The Officer should be appointed before the middle of September so that he can visit the banks and become acquainted with the position of the various banks prior to the peat season, which generally commences early in October.

So long as a persons peat is not run over or interfered with in any way I see no reason why another person cannot cross over, as in many cases it is the only way and also saves a considerable lot of time.

All peat banks on brown Land (Stanley Common) are under the control of the officer in charge of the reat banks and in the absence of specific rules he should le quided by local custom or exercise his discretion in such matters.

The reat banks and the rest therein are the property of the brown to which the individual has no right until cut by him or he has caused it to be cut for him after first obtaining authority to do so.

If Mr. on oullan feels aggriered by Mr. Poole's act he should complain to the Officer in charge of the rest banks, she officer could give Shr. Poole permission to cross on. or orillan's bank if no mitable alternative route can be found, movided the rest already cut by our, on millan is not likely to be damaged or the officer could refuse access accors the bunk until our on Millan had had reasonable time to clear it of peat already cut.

The Hon. Col. Secy.,

I beg to submit herewith revised lists of Peat Banks, to supersede Lists I and 2 of 7/12/17 herein, also tracing of Plan 3(showing the new banks in the East Section) with List No. 3 to accompany plan.

- 2. During the last five years it has been possible to settle amicably all disputes and differences between occupiers of the various peat banks, but on a few occasions it would have been an advantage to have had the support of the rules suggested by the Commission in 1917 (see page 8 para. 5) At present the rules are carried out as far as possible, but should any person refuse to do as requested I fear I have no written authority to compel him to do as instructed.
- 3. Since I921 several householders who formerly obtained their peat from private land have been stopped and have had to obtain a bank from the Government, consequently several extra banks have had to be provided and as the tracks to the east banks are the most convenient for carting extension has been made to the east.
- 4. I am of opinion that in about 1926 or 1927 banks will have to be opened on the south side of the ridge to the east of the Town; by then there will be a good track over the ridge. With this in view a section of peat has been removed across the ridge so giving the width for an ordinary cart to pass.
- 5. Should, as I have reason to think it will, the Citroen-Kegresse Car be a siccess the difficulty of transport will to a great degree be overcome; it will only then be a question of arranging depots for the peat from which the general carters can load and deliver to the various householders, or other suitable arrangement which can be gone into later.
- 6. In conclusion the present system of allocations works as well as can be expected. There are occasional cases of encroachment but I am glad to say that most of the householders are anxious to avoid disputes.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

RULES GOVERNING THE APPORTIONMENT AND WORKING OF THE PEAT BANKS SITUATED ON CROWN LAND IN THE VICINITY OF STANLEY.

H. HENNIKER-HEATON,

Acting Governor.

1. These Rules may be cited as "The Peat Banks Rules, Short title. 1924."

2. There shall be an Officer-in-Charge of the Peat Banks, hereinafter referred to as the Officer-in-Charge, who shall be directly responsible to the Colonial Engineer for the satisfactory observance of these rules.

Officer responsible for observance of Rules.

3. The use of the Peat Banks in the vicinity of Stanley is apportioned as follows:—

Apportionment of Peat Banks.

- (a) A Peat Bank is allotted to each dwelling house in Stanley. The present recognized allotment of Banks is recorded on a list which may be inspected at the office of the Colonial Engineer.
- (b) A limited number of Peat Banks is available for allotment to persons who are desirous of cutting peat for sale.
- 4. The quantity of fuel which may be taken from any Peat Bank during a season shall be determined by the Colonial Engineer and shall be published in a list which may be inspected at the Colonial Engineer's Office,

Quantity of Peat which can be cut in a Season.

Provided that, during the season following the allotment of a Bank, double the quantity stated in the list may be cut and stacked, in order to allow of one season's peat being in hand.

5. Except as hereinafter provided, the peat cut from any Bank allotted under Rule 3 (a) shall only be consumed within the premises to which the Bank has been allotted,

Peat to be consumed in premises to which Bank has been allotted.

Provided that the Officer-in-Charge may grant permission to a householder, on application, to cut from his Bank a quantity of peat for sale, not exceeding 75 cubic yards. This permission will only be granted in exceptional cases where neither the privileges of the owner of the house, nor the value of the neighbouring banks will be prejudicially affected.

6. The allotment of Peat Banks as provided for in Rule 3 (b) shall be made on application to the Officer-in-Charge, and, if approved, the applicant's name shall be registered. All such applications must be renewed annually, the Banks reverting to the Crown at the end of each season. The peat stacked on these Banks must be removed early in the season following that on which it is cut, if not previously disposed of.

Applications for Banks from which to cut peat for sale.

7. All peat must be cut out to bottom and the ends of Banks where the peat runs out must also be cut until a sound bottom is obtained. No bank shall be regarded as exhausted until all broken parts have been cleared and the ground left clear of peat. No new Bank will be finally allotted unless this Rule has been observed.

Banks must be exhausted before being abandoned.

Depth of Bank faces.

8. The Peat Bank faces shall not be deeper than four feet. Where the Bank is over four feet, the face shall be worked back in step formation, the first cut being three feet deep and being carried back for a distance of fifteen feet before the second cut is commenced.

Banks must be cleared of loose peat.

9. Persons cutting in a bank, or opening a Bank, must rickle all the peat cut and, if unable to remove the peat during the season, must cause it to be stacked, clear of Banks and cart tracks. The peat so stacked must be removed during the next season. Failure to observe this Rule will render the Bank holder liable to the forfeiture of the peat cut and remaining on the ground.

Disposal of top sods.

10. All top sods, after being removed from the top of the Bank, must be properly laid under foot, so as to form the top sod of the next cut or the top soil of a hard bottom.

Water must not be allowed to accumulate in trenches.

11. Banks must be drained, as far as possible, and water in any quantity, which would become a source of danger, must not be allowed to lodge in the trenches. Neither must the trenches be left in such a condition as to render them liable to flood.

Penalty for non-observance of Rules.

12. If any person disobeys or fails to comply with any of these Rules or to carry out any proper directions of the Colonial Engineer in relation to the Peat Banks, the Governor in Council may order the reversion to the Crown of the use of the Peat Bank in respect of which an offence is committed.

Saving Clause.

13. Nothing in these Rules shall limit, in any degree, the right of the Crown to resume any Peat Bank or part of a Peat Bank at any time and without compensation, where the public interest so requires.

with a view to assisting in the compilation of an up-to-date list of peat banks allotted to householders in Stanley and to assist in any re-allocation of banks, the Government request that householders will forward particulars of their peat bank (or banks) to the Officer-in-Charge of the Peat Banks (Mr. A.H.Hills), giving the approximate position and the boundaries of the bank.

Persons having "Carter's" banks allotted to them for cutting peat for sale are reminded that, under Clause 6 of The Feat Bank Rules 1924 application should be made annually for the renewal of these peat banks.

Poat Banks

The other day we spoke about the lack of post banks and the fact that peat banks had not been cut down to the bettem. Since then my attention has been drawn to Rule 7 of the Peat Bank Rules appearing at page 203 of the 2nd Volume of the Laws of the Falkland Islands which says that all peat must be cut out to bottem and the ends of banks where the peat runs out must also be cut until a sound bottom is obtained. No bank should be regarded as exhausted until all broken parts have been cleared and the ground left clear of peat. No new bank would be finally alloted unless this rule has been observed. Then going into the question of the need for new peat banks which is being gone into now we should make sure that no new banks are given until the requirements of the law have been complied with. We should also see that the requirements of the law are complied with by us when we are getting Government banks out.
