With reference to Mr. M. Butcher of government tenders, I cannot confirm what he was, or was not told last year, or if in fact he did, or did not tender. My advice on this years offers, is that he should tender in the normal manner using the carrect procedure 'through the Chairman, Tender 'Board', it would hovever be to everyones advantage, if Mr. Butcher would assist the board of stating the fact it is to be machine out in his tender.

- 2. The controvercy about the top layer being 'laid in, etc' should be now disregarded, the instruction regarding this, and I quote "The surface of the groun to a depth of 3 inches is to be properly cleared and existing peat walls of peat cuttings to be cut away before measurements are computed" unquote, was an instruction issued eighteen years ago, 8th October, 1958 to be exact; was made out by the A. G. Denten-Thomson Colonial Secretary. As a point of interest the price cut and thrown then = 7 per cubic yard. Mechanisation is inevitable today, but control is importive, where this one rule of cutting off the first 3 inches need not apply today, nor indeed is it important if the sods a 'slightly out of square', by the same token it is important to consider the whole set-up is not abused, such as sods in excess of 9" the true measurement of the peat cuttings, leaving the banks in a reasonable condition, etc.
- 3. I am sure this will have cleared up the Butcher query, in short it is not necessary to relay the grass mat, and there is no instruction issued to say they must.

Notes on Proposed Revision.

- There shall be an officer-in-charge of the Peat Banks hereinafter 1. referred to as the officer-in-charge, who shall be directly re sponsible to the Superintendent of Public Works for the satisfactory observance of the rules.
- Any person who shall cut or cause to be cut any peat on Crown 2. lands without the consent of government shall be liable on a conviction to a fine not exceeding £5. for each day peat is so cut.
- A peat bank will be allocated to each dwelling house in Stanley. 3. The recognized allotment of banks is recorded and retained in Public Works Department office.
- 4. The quantity of fuel which may be taken from any peat bank during a season may very according to demand shall be determined by the Superintendent of Works.
- Except as hereinafter provided the peat cut from any bank allotted 5. under rule 3 shall only be consumed within the premises to which the bank has been allotted: Provided that the officer-in-charge may permission to a householder, on application, to cut from his bank a quantity of peat, not exceeding 100 cubic metres. This permission will only be granted in exceptional cases where neither the priveledges of the owner of the house, not the the value of the neighbouring banks will be prejudicially affected.
- No bank shall be regarded as exhausted until all the peat has been cut 6. out to the bottom, and ground left clear of peat. No new bank will be allotted unless this rule has been observed.
- 7. The peat bank faces shall not be deeper than 1.20 metres. the peat bank is over 1.20 metres, the face shall be worked back in step formation, the first cut being 1 metre deep by hand, and 1.10 by mechanical means, and being carried back for a distance of 5 metres before the second cut is commenced.
- 8. Persons cutting in a bank, or opening a bank, by hand, or machine must ruckle or cause to be reckled all the peat cut, and, if unable to remove the peat during the season, must cause it to be stacked clear of neighbouring banks and tracks. Failure to observe must be removed during the next season. this rule will render to bank holder liable to the forfeiture of the peat cut on the ground.
- All top sods cut by hand must be properlly laid in under foot. Top turf cut by machine must be returned to the lower part of the 9. bank in an orderly manner as not to impede a second cut where this is applicable.
- 10. Banks must be drained, as far as possible, and water in any quantity, which would become a source of danger, must not be allowed to lodge in the trenches, and trenches must not left in such a condition as not to render them liable to flood.

- 11. Specific authority must be attained before any peat bank is cut by mechanical means, no permission will be granted to cut by mechanical means where this becomes detrirental to any other peat bank or to prevention of further cuts in the peat bank. Peat banks having been cut by mechanical means must leave the banks in a straight and orderly manner with conditions not to impede further cuts by hand.
- 12. If a person disobeys or fails to comply with any of these rules or to carry out any proper directions of the officer-in-charge and, or the Superintendent of Public Works in relation to peat banks the Governor in Gouncil may order the reversion to the Crown of the use of the peat bank in respect of which an offence is committed.
- Nothing in these rules shall limit in any degree the right of the Crown to resume any peat bank or part-there of at any time and without compensation, where the public interest so requires.

We do of course have manpower problems, and in particular from the very small selection of skilled operators. The Government Plant used in this operation, is, as we all appreciate, an expensive outlay, and the aim is to justify the cost by producing peat at an economic level.



HEATING OF GOVERNMENT HOUSES.

For description purposes the houses can be classed in four categories.

- (a) Central heating installation reasonable condition.
- (b) Central heating installed int in very poor condition.
- (c) Two or three bedroom houses with no central heating.
- (d) Small accomodation with no central heating.
- (a) In category A there are 29 houses or flats which have automatic central heating, chiefly oil-fired. Unfortunately there are several different type of units which means that the standardization of spares is impossible. Being automatic they require frequent attention, adding to the workload on the plumbing staff, this should be taken into consideration as to the true overall cost to the Government. The cost of the fuel, even at present prices is a constant complaint from the householder.
- (b) There are 8 houses in this category, which are equiped with oil fired, warm air, ducted systems of Canadian make. No spares are available for the oil burners or the furnaces as the manufacturer went bankrupt, and although operating at present, with constant repairs, it is most probable that they will all be out of commission in 2 to 3 years time. Three **new** furnaces are on order for replacement at a cost of approximately £1000 each, and as these can be installed to the existing ductwork, this is the cheapest way of keeping these systems in operation Two years ago prices were obtained for the materials to replace these systems with oil-fired hot water central heating, and the cheapest was £2,043 F.O.B. Londor 16 Feburary 1979 (this price did not include for domestic hot water.
- (c) There are 38 houses in this group which are of the 2-3 bedroom type. The only he ting is provided by a Rayburn Cooker in the kitchen and a stove or open fire place in the living room, consequently the rest of the house is damp and cold in unfavourable weather. If the existing Rayburns were with an MF type boiler and an indirect cylinder with radiators installed, these houses could be provided with a good background heat in every room for approximately £700 each (cost of materials) This system could also be used in place of the warm air whits in Cat B houses at a considerable saving. Peat could be used to cust the cost of fuel, oib burners could be installed where required and I have written for advice as to the recommended type of oil burner.

It seems essential to have a policy for the heating of these houses for a few reas 1/ The present state of the oil market (cost and availability)

2/ Standardization of spares

3/ Simplicity in maintenance

4/ Initial cost of installation

6/ To havein hand the materials to replace the warm air units in the Dorran house which are in a fragile condition.

To take the Dorra houses as an example and to give a reasonable comparison on the cost of the various methods of heating.

1/ To replace present unit with oil-fired hot water central heating. COST2 Material FOB London (Feb 1979) £2043.00 This did not include for domestic hot water and cooking facilities, adding to the fuel costs (approx 14 gals per week)

2/ To install new warm air furnace to existing ductwork, COST- Materials £1000 (last years price) This also does not provide for domestic hot water, therefor a Rayburn required as above.

3/ To instal an M.F. type boiler in existing Rayburn cooker.

COST - Materials approx £700 for peat fired and £800 for oil fired.

This would then provide theecooking facilities throughout the house, augmented by r

BHYthe existing peat stove in living room.

FUEL: - Approximately 200 cu yds of peat or 1,250 gals of oil per year (manufacturers figures)

In the case of peat fired units, virtually no maintenance is required.

It appears that if peat was thought to be the answer to the fuel problem, then some thought would have to be given to providing adequate stocks.

To heat a Dorran type 3 bedroom house completely by gas would cost approximately £900.00 for materials. This would allow for the appropriate size heater in the livi room, kitchen and 3 bedrooms, a four burner gas cooker and 25gal water heater two reducing sales. VALUES

I refer to the misunderstanding between Fr. Les Halliday and Mr. Robert Watson relating to excavation and access in and to their peat banks.



SOLID FUEL FOR DOMESTIC CONSUMPTION IN STANLEY

Further to the joint coordination meeting held on Wednesday 30 June 1982 I have now had time to investigate this matter which was raised in discussion. The situation is very serious and urgent action will have to be taken to alleviate real hardship to our townsfolk and to cater in the long term for the towns' requirements. The four fuels for domestic purposes are peat, kerosene (including Avcat), diesel oil and propane.

· Peat

The situation here is that what stacks were held at the time of the surrender of the Argentine forces have dwindled to but a few days for a considerable number of our citizens. For instance four people gave notice of their poor stacks during the course of this morning.

There is no doubt that alternative means of cooking and water heating must be found for them, and others, in the short term. In the long term, even if Lt. Col. Field can clear the mined peat banks by September, it will not avert the crisis because peat requires 12 month for drying out.

Therefore it is my opinion that solid fuel will have to be shipped to the Falkland Islands. As explained at our meeting on 30 June Rayburn cookers (and water heaters) can burn this type of fuel without conversion as that is what they were designed for. Types of solid fuel that is recommended by Messrs. Allied from Founders Ltd, the manufacturer, are as follows:

Anthracite
Dry Steam coal
Rexco
Coalite
Phurnacite

The quantities required for this type of fuel is based on an average of 2 cwt per week per Rayburn and 2 cwt per living room fire. The number of houses requiring solid fuel is estimated to be 200.

Hence for a supply to last one year before the peat fuel is ready for burning is

4 cwt x 200 x 52 = 41600 cwt = 2080 long tons (say 2000 tons)

The preferred fuel would be Phurnacite as already imported for some farm settlements by F.I.C.

The price of this fuel, probably the most expensive, landed in Stanley prior to the invasion was £ 13 - 60 per cwt. (£13.60 x 41600 = £ 565760 per annum) Clearly a subsidy or direct aid to consumers, denied access to peat banks during the Argentine invasion etc., would be necessary at such a price.

2. Kerosene

The Rayburn may be converted to burning liquid fuel. Kerosene or Avcat giving a clearer burn than diesel oil which carbonizes the wick in about 3 to 4 weeks. Cooking with kerosene or diesel is very difficult when a Don Burner conversion kit is installed. However in the short term, mentioned in one above, it could be the solution if liquid fuel is available and if the conversion kits were flown out to the Islands. This is not recommended as a long term solution but is probably cheaper. All our spare Don Burner kits were destroyed in the Flumbers Shop Fire.

. Propane Gas

Some households use this form of fuel for heating and cooking. Argentine bottles, which are used in the Islands, do not fit their British equivalent at the bottle connection. Import of the British product should include the British connectors in the first instance. It is understood that the Calor Gas Company may transport in bulking but this requires a storage tank and filling station for hottles. In the first instance bottles will have to be imported for existing users. It is not considered however a viable solution to make up for the shortage of peat.

The considerable stocks of bottled gas held by the firm of Gas del Estado at the time of the Argentine surrender were handed over to Central Stores. Since then the military have been taking large quantities of the gas without any apparant accounting. Obviously the civilian population will soon be running short who are at present buying gas from our Supplies Officer. It is hoped that further replacement stock from Britain have been organized by the military.

Finally the town is most anxious to know what is planned to meet the short and long term difficulty and I feel an announcement of agreed policy, at the highest level, would be most welcome.

SUPPLY OF FUEL

Further to my recent discussion with you I now write confirming my request for military assistance.

Short term emergency measure for Peat

As I mentioned I have had a reconnaissance carried out by my Peat Officer to find any stocks of cut peat in the Stanley area. With the use of binoculars peat stacks have been located which are guessed to be approximately equal to 700 cu yards (535 m³) in total. The peat is located in two main areas and it is requested that they be air-lifted to a central dumping ground.

One area is at Rookery Bay (540 cu. yards) and the other at bliza Cove (140 cu. yards). The dumping ground chosennis adjacent to the airport access road and all locations are shown marked on the attached map. There may be more cut peat in these areas which should also be collected if possible.

It is understood that you may not have suitable containers for the operation but that small guage nets are available. The density of dried peat varies considerably but might be of the order of 0.30 ton per cu. yard. It was agreed that the P.W.D. would provide labour at the peat banks for collecting the peat and loading the nets, providing the area is safe from mines and booby traps. The Department will also provide labour at the dumping ground.

From the dumping ground the P.W.D. will, in conjunction with the Government Stores Officer, distribute the peat to members of the Public who have run out of this particular type of fuel. Compensation will be paid to the present owners of the peat in cash or kind in due course. This assistance will also benefit military personnel at present bill ted with civilians.

In accordance with Lt. Col. Field's request for information as to what peat bank areas should be cleared of mines it is suggested that the banks on either side of the Airport Access Road be given priority attention so that cutting may commence in September this year.

It would also be helpful to have an aerial inspection of the 60 acre peat bank area as soon as possible. This is not visable from any road and may have further stocks of peat. Please let me know if you could arrange this. The area is in the direction of Moody Brook and to the south of the road. Nembers of my staff will carry out the short survey from a helicopter without landing.

Finally, on the matter of peat, I should point out that the ground conditions at this time of year would exclude any attempt to bring in the peat using vehicles (irrespective of the mine hazzard), and that solid fuel has already been ordered from the United Kingdom. This request for assistance is to bridge the gap until the fuel arrives in Stanley.

Kerosene

In accordance with your request it is estimated that Stanley needs 6000 gallons per month of Kerosene. By copy of this letter I am suggesting that the Civil Administration order a 6 month supply for Stanley from the U.K. in 40 gallon drums. In the meantime and until this order arrives the requirement for the civil population (and

soldiers staying in the houses) would be of the same order. (Rayburn Cookers take 60 gallons per month and 100 houses rely on this fuel - bacis of estimate)

Bottled Gas

It is assumed that 50 houses in Stanley rely on propane gas. The average consumption is 5 bottles per month of the large 45 kilogram type. It is suggested that stocks should be ordered from the U.K. for a minimum of 6 months supply $(5 \times 50 \times 6 \text{ month} = 1500 \text{ bottles})$.

Camp also consumes a similar amount and it appears that the ex-Argentine stock is being rapidly diminished by army personnel using helicopters and flying it to the farms without consulting the Government Supply Officer who now has charge of the stock.

By copy of this letter I suggest to the Civil Administration that 3000 bottles of the 45 kilo type be ordered from the U.K. for Stenley and Camp with suitable British connectors in this first order.

I would also request that any Military users of our present fuel stock be asked to contact Mr. Tony Carey, at Government Central Stores, before taking the gas bottles from the store area near the Y.P.F. installation to transport to Camp or for use in their Stanley accommodation.

VEHICLE RECOVERY

Tipper Trucks at Bluff Cove

There are two of my tipper trucks in the Bluff Cove area which we request should be airlifted into the Pony Pass road quarry. For locations see enclosed maps. The vehicles were bogged down by the Argentines and cannot be recovered in any other way. They have been inspected by PATA mechanics and could soon be put in running order. The trucks are 9 tonners and can be driven from the quarry into Stanley along the road after further inspection by PATA.

Both are urgently required by my Department for Municipal duties and for the

Building Branch in addition to my first priority list of transport.

TRANSPORT REQUIREMENT

I was sorry to learn that you had been unsuccessful so far in providing the first priority list of transport set out in my letter to you dated 5 July 1982. I realise you have a great number of priority requests for vehicles but it is becoming impossible for my Department to centinue to cope with providing water, electricity and vital building repairs for the needs of civilians and military personnel unless I have the modest amount of vehicles and lorries requested to get my organization going.

Thank you for your continued efforts on my behalf in such ε difficult situation and with so many vital problems to solve at such short notice.





- / l. I attach a paper showing the position regarding the cost of subsidising fuel. There are almost unlimited permutations of what steps we might take.
 - 2. It is not absolutely clear how the misunderstandings on the price of solid fuel and propane arose but we must, I think, explain to FCO that the income from solid fuel sales is unlikely to cover the cost of the subsidy if FIG have to meet the cost of returning the propane cylinders. I accordingly suggest we send a telegram to FCO asking if they will bear this cost from rehabilitation funds.
 - 3. If FCO agree to this, I suggest that the cost of kerosene be increased to, say, 20p a litre as soon as possible with a further hike to its true economic cost in three months' time. It would be sensible to announce this to the public so that they will get used to the idea, and, perhaps, make alternative arrangements. It seems clear that the cost of diesel should be increased in step with the price of kerosene, so as to discourage a change to diesel with the highest than the public would buy solid fuel at £6 a bag, an increase from £3 to £4 might not deter them and this would bring in an extra £15,000 gross. We could perhaps try this?

FUEL SUBSIDY

1. The position regarding the price of fuel and the likely cost of subsidies is as follows:

Solid Fuel

- 1. 1,000 tonnes were supplied free of charge and freight charges. FCO believe we are charging £3 for 20kg bags and £6 for 40kg bags and that consequently we shall gross £150,000, which can be used to subsidise kerosene and propane prices.
- 2. However, the solid fuel, which in fact comes in 25 and 50kg bags, is being sold at £3 for 50kg. 2 x 50kg bags will run a rayburn for a week and £6 was considered the maximum that people could afford. 4,297 bags of the total of 20,000 bags have already been sold at this price and if this continues only £60,000 will be grossed from the sales.
- 3. If the prices doubles (after, say, 5,000 bags have been sold) the total accruing will be £105,000. But there may be sales resistance to a price of £6 a bag and a quick reversion to peat. This could mean that we would be left with stocks of solid fuel which we could not sell.

Kerosene

- 4. 800 x 205 litre barrels (164,000 litres) were supplied at 28.94p per litre, free of freight charges. London have asked for authority to debit FIG account with Crown Agents with the £47,461.60 purchase price.
- 5. This shipment has not yet been sold (so no subsidy is so far involved) as the civil population are obtaining supplies from the military at 14.3p per litre. However, as from 1 November this price is being increased to 28.7p per litre.
- 6. In the two months 27 July to 27 September, 23,380 litres were sold. A similar amount was sold in the month 28 September to 27 October probably reflecting the run-down in ex-Argentine stocks. An educated guess for the likely sales in November is 32,000 litres. If the price to the customer is held at 14.3p, the monthly subsidy on kerosene will cost FIG £4,608. An increase to, say, 20p per litre would result in a monthly subsidy of £2,784. This will apply whether the 800 barrels of emergency kerosene are sold or if the public continue to buy from the military. But until FIG start selling the emergency supply, no money at all will accrue to Treasure towards the £47,461 initial cost.
- 7. However, an increase in the cost of kerosene would be likely to cause a change-over to diesel fuel for domestic heating, unless the were a corresponding increase in prices. On 28 October, the Government



diesel tanks held 510 tonnes, and a further 1,721 tonnes has been allocated by the Ministry of Defence at the old price. Government consumption is 110 tonnes per month. FIC sell a maximum of 1,500 cu a year; and there are ample reserves. This means that the price could be held at 74p per gallon for at least 12 months.

- 8. 1,504 cylinders costing £35 each (total £52,640) were shipped free of freight charges. The price includes rental charges and handling, but no deposit on the cylinders which have to be returned to UK (FCO TelNo 128). It has not been established at whose cost this will be, though no doubt FCO will expect it to be met from the £150,000.
-). Although it was decided that the cylinders should be sold at £0.38 such, they were in fact being sold at £3.23. Up to 28 October 151 had been sold.
- 10. 1,04 calinders at this price will gross £12,378. Thus the subsidy will be £40,262. If however FIG is expected to pay the return freign and handling (which will probably be £25 per cylinder) a further £27,000 will be required, bringing the subsidy on propane to £77,362.

Dear John The Argineers are getting on with their work and it looks as if we may be able to move into our house about the end of next week - i.c. over four weeks offen arriving in Port Howard. We will not be able to move straight in as the Engineers leave as in son cases their work is of a low standard and shoddy and will require putting right, wall penels have been roughly patched instead of changed, likewise the damaged where the hole has been filled in with putty to a rough finish. The plumbing will also require some attention. The stove is not even in straight and the pipes have been pricked up behind it. Likovise some light fittings and sochets, althoug installed safely are just plonked in the middle of wall panels with wires straigh with no attempt to "hide" them alongside door facings, wall corners etc. The house will also of course require a complete paint over inside as well as a Sereral clear-up, although this was inevitable anyway with army boots. In general it is obvious that although no doubt very good at doing organised construction works with a verbatim instruction manual to follow, you give a trained Royal A claser a small practical problem and they are completley stumped having very little practical imagination. The lass themselves are willing enough but have just not been supplied with the might materials from the start which has not helped either. Cortainly in his death it would have been better if just the stove and materials had been ampedied and them I could have done the job properly myself. The windows and gattering have been well repaired however. They are unable to fit the oil burner into the Rayburn, they have not the fittings and piping to connect the burner to a tank, but more importantly the old chimney is entirely unsuitable for an oil burning stove because of its shape and internal dimensions. Therefore the Rayburn is installed as a solid Aug burner, which is what it is designed for in the first place anyway. This of means that I will urgently require a supply of coal. One might add that the fact that the Rayburn is the wrong 'hand' as regards the boiler has made the destalling job oven worse anyway. Jimy is using over a bag of Coalite a day in his Rayburn as he has no Post fit to use (I have nt even any unfit to use!) so I will be needing a of 100 bags of cool for the next twelve months. A further smaller supply will be nocided for the lounge fire, as yet I do not know how much. At present I have about 30 hags only so will need coal URGENTLY. I would suggest that the diesel sent out last month for the old broken is re-allocated as part of the stocks missing from the generator and tract fuel packs Bros had there before.

Even though I hope to move in next weekend, I do not think you ally relies that both Jimmy and I have a completley untenable and unworkable relies the timber and fencing materials we asked for some time ago are supplied. The St. Brandon was here last week and brought nothing.





PEAT BANK ACCESS - STANLEY AMMUNITION DEPOT

With reference to our letter of 18th June 1985 on the above subject, a copy of which is attached.

The track leading south off the Rookery Bay road within the Stanley Ammunition Dump has recently had a new stone dressed surface laid over it, which has raised the level of the track by approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ metre. On either side of the track, drainage ditches have been dug without replacing the original crossing points,which gave access to the peat banks. Although turn-offs have been formed to facilitate access, they cannot be used as the areas around them have been churned up by your contractors plant into an impassable boq.

It is clear that no notice has been taken of the attached letter, which was written in the hope that the problems now being experienced would have been avoided.

With the peat carting season about to begin, I would be grateful if you could arrange for one of your staff to accompany the Peat Officer, Mr M Clarke, and visit the area to agree a way in which access to the peat-cuttings can be returned to normal.



DAMAGE TO PEAT BANK

Sometime during the latter half of last week, a military BV tracked vehicle was driven across the peat bank belonging to Mrs Celia Turner. The bank lies to the east of a minefield north of Mullet Creek. Its approximate position being marked in orange on the attached map.

Not only did the BV cause extensive damage to the peat bank, but it also flattened 6 cubic yards of newly cut peat. This being the equivalent of a weeks fuel supply. The damage could easily have been avoided, by the driver of the vehicle making a 10 yard detour around the bank. What happened was not only thoughtless, but quite irresponsible.

In monetary terms, the value of the peat that was lost is small. It is not intended therefore to seek compensation this time for the loss of the fuel. My concern at this stage is that with the peat cutting season having started, the same thing could happen again. I would be grateful to receive your assurance that it will not. If, however, similar incidents should occur, then a claim will be submitted against MOD for the full reimbursement of all losses involved.




