Sir,

With reference to your code telegram of 5th August, I have the honour to report the arrival on the 5th Instant, of Mr. Winthrop Sprague Brooks, with a letter of introduction from the British Embassy, Washington, dated 30th July, 1915, signed by Mr. Colville Barclay, M.V.O., Counsellor of His Majesty's Embassy (in the absence of the Ambassador).

2. I have also to report the arrival on the 12th Instant, of Mr. Rollo H. Beck, with a letter of introduction from the British Embassy, Washington, dated the 11th November, 1913, signed by the Honourable Ernest Scott, C.M.G., M.V.O. (for the Ambassador).

3. Both Mr. Brooks and Mr. Beck have come to the Falkland Islands to study bird life and collect specimens,

Mr. Brooks for the Museum Comparative Zoology of Cambridge, Massachusetts, and,

Mr. Beck for the American Museum of Natural History, New York.

4. I have, under "The Wild Animals and Birds Protection (amendment) Ordinance", 1913, issued licences to Mr. Brooks and Mr. Beck authorizing each of them to take for scientific purposes for the Museums they represent, and not for commercial purposes, ten specimens of each description of bird named in the Schedule to the Ordinance.
