

Sir,

I am directed to inform you that at a general meeting of the Council on the 8th November, 1961, members unanimously agreed that the Gymnasium building be handed over to Government.

The building is hired by the Stanley Badminton Club at a reduced fee of 4/2d per hour and is used by the Club for approximately two hours twice weekly during the winter months.

One room is hired to the Guild of Spinners and Weavers at a rental of £5 per annum for their monthly meetings.

As expenditure has exceeded revenue for a very long time, Council feel that Government might be able to make use of the building.

A number of glass show-cases, once used for exhibits in the Museum, are stored in the Gymnasium. Council cannot visualise usage for them and would like to dispose of them but believe Government approval should first be obtained. Your guidance on this last matter, Sir, would be appreciated.

Dear Sirs,

I reply to your letter TC/II dated 16th August, 1961, requesting the removal of the property belonging to The Boys' Brigade, stored in rooms in the Gymnasium. I regret to inform you that to date I have not been successful in finding store-room elsewhere.



Dear Sir,

I was very disappointed to receive a letter from the Clerk to Council conveying the decision of Council not to allow the Town Hall to be used for badminton. This is a great disappointment to those who are trying in the face of ever increasing difficulties and lack of support, even from directions from which we might reasonably expect it, to keep some sporting and social activities going in Stanley. The decision of Council is difficult to understand when it is recalled that both the present and old Town Halls were used for badminton and the present hall is little used at any time and certainly not during the earlier part of the evening when it would be used by badminton players.


When I originally addressed the Council on this subject I realised that there were many points which might need thrashing out and rather than go into a lengthy discussion on paper I suggested that perhaps I could meet the appropriate committee of Council for this purpose. I presume that this request has been turned down and Council felt able to reach a decision without hearing representatives of the Stanley Badminton Club. This suggests that Council have good and sufficient reasons for not allowing the Town Hall to be used for badminton, but, as and for the reasons mentioned in the first paragraph it is difficult to understand what these reasons can be. It would be of the greatest help if we could be told these reasons so that we may be able to argue against them as we are anxious to find some solution to our problem and the use of the Town Hall seems to be the only possible one - however remote.

I do feel that it is my duty on behalf of the Stanley Badminton Club to do all I can to find alternative accomodation for our club activities and my objective now must be to try and get Council to reverse their decision. I still feel that the next step should be a meeting between myself and the appropriate committee of Council so that both sides of the question can be heard and any possible misunderstandings avoided. Relations between the Town Council and the Stanley Badminton Club have always been most cordial

As the above suggests the Rubbish Dump is again alive with Rats and proving very difficult to combat. (a) Because of the area of the Dump (b) Foodstuffs such as rotten fruit, vegetables and meat being deposited in increasing amounts. I have done my best to burn areas where both food and Rats are in abundance and believe this measure has to some degree proved effective. However with laying poison results have to date not been so satisfactory as a fair proportion of the receptacles where poison is laid get turned over by persons scavenging, even so it has proved very difficult to find the actual runs so as to know where to lay poison. Untill a few months ago this Dump was virtually Rat free and it is my opinion that the Butler Pig Stys built on the foreshore are mainly responsible.

The main source of Rat infiltration to Stanley premises is through faulty drains, i.e. Open Drains, Catch Pits without proper covers, old disused washhouse drains etc.,. Generally speaking I find the Public very co-operative in putting these faults right and thus keeping Rats at bay.
