I have searched records in this office & only reference, which I can find, to chart showing sections is O.A.G. (Mr Melville) despatch No 79 of 24 July 1893 reporting that Mr Hudson (surveyor) had "completed a new chart of Records of the Landholds & Freeholds of the Colony aided by the old chart of Records." a copy was sent to C.O. for reference.

2. This was evidently the chart a copy of which is attached: there is a note on it by Mr Hudson to effect that "The Boundaries of the different sections are taken from the description in the 'Land Book' with the aid of the Chart of Records."
3. There is a further note "Magnetic variation in 1912 decreasing about 6' annually." Is it correct that there was no later value for charts than that in M.P. 414/1908?
4. From what I was told by Mr. Stimpert a reprint will be costly: it is important however that you should be chart showing corner boundaries & I shall be glad if Ref. Com. will proceed with preparation as proposed.

Since our conversation I have given careful consideration to the matter of insertion of readjusted boundaries on the chart, as well as to the larger matter of the use of an Admiralty Chart for the purpose of endeavouring to represent inland farm-acreages.

2. It would appear that many of the leases and agreements are of such a character as to leave me in doubt concerning the precise positions of the boundaries to which they refer. The farmers concerned have interpreted their agreements and adjusted their boundaries to their own mutual satisfaction. A survey by myself of the present positions of the boundary-fences

offers a twofold objection (a) It would consume a large amount of my already limited time and often take me far away from those areas in which I can most satisfactorily conduct the work of geological survey. (b) Unofficial interpretations of boundary-positions by the farmers themselves, even when charted by me, could have no weight with Government Departments.

3. With regard to the larger matter of the use of the Admiralty Chart of the Falkland Islands for the purposes of delineating farm-boundaries and determining acreages, the impossibility of any accurate estimation of areas by this means should be pointed out. Not only are the errors involved of a fairly large order (in my opinion) but such errors vary with latitude and result in acreage-computations affecting different farmers unequally - giving some an advantage and pressing hardly upon others.

4. It would be possible, as the result of laborious and somewhat abstruse mathematical calculation, followed by careful and even more laborious map-drawing, to convert the present Mercator chart of the Falkland Islands into a map which would show the true shape and area of the Islands; and if the chart could be relied upon for accuracy, it would be worth while, in my opinion, for such work to be undertaken. However, in view of the facts that the chart is well known to be rather seriously in error in certain places, and that the insertion of the coastline is admitted to be only approximate in regard to the details, I feel that the results achieved would not be commensurate with the labour involved.

5. Should the question of the accurate determination

determination of farm-acreages be regarded as a pressing one, it seems to me that only a revision of the Admiralty Chart, followed by work of the nature I have indicated, or a complete land-survey of the Falkland Islands, could satisfactorily settle the matter.

2. It has been the subject of remark that the colouring on the new chart does not make the division between various estates sufficiently clear. This is particularly the case with regard to the estate in the west of Lewis & the Green hills and that marked Vee Roke.

3. I have discussed the matter with the Col. Engineer who has tried two systems & then to make the distinction clear and I now forward the maps. The new colouring was done by Mr. Barclay and took about five hours to do neither the paints nor the brushes obtainable were suitable but if all lettering could be left untouched the result would certainly be more effective than the latching. An extra charge could be made for maps so altered.


