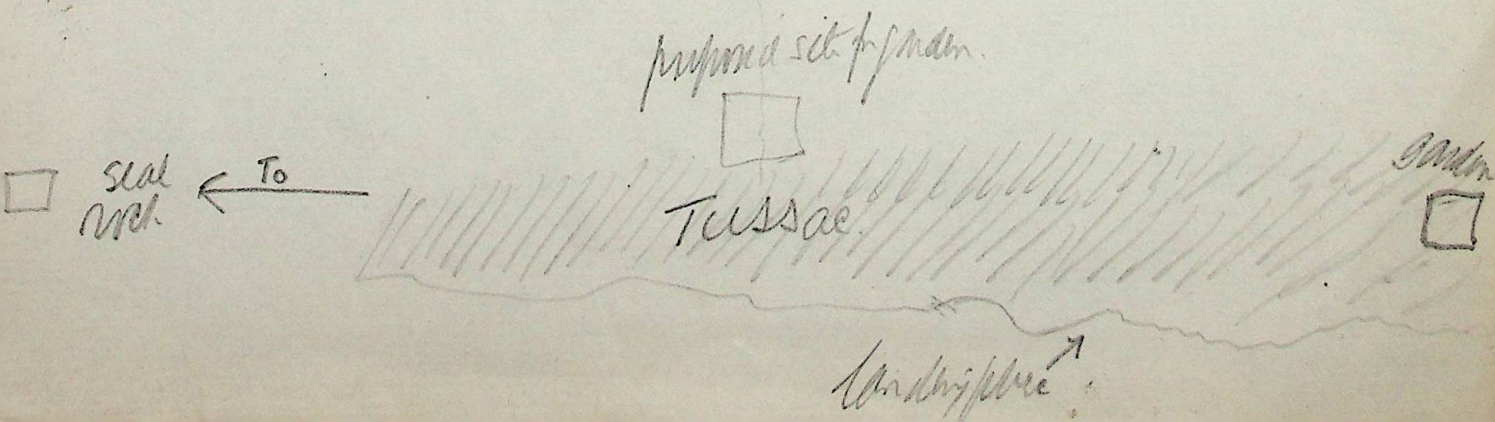

after visiting Slephant Lagoon on 2<sup>nd</sup> December  
I made arrangements with Mr. Arthur Feltton  
near Point to supply a cow. As there is  
plenty of feed on the island & if a cow is  
kept the expenditure on milk & butter  
should be greatly reduced. No price was  
agreed upon that must be left to Mr. Feltton.

2. I also discussed with the gardener in charge  
the marking up of ground for a garden. The  
small garden which he has made is amongst  
the tussocks & Mr. Feltton approved the fact  
that the tussock ground was not good for vegetables.

3. Mr. Feltton considered the most suitable  
ground to be on a small valley which is  
shown roughly below. The garden should be  
outside the tussock ground but <sup>set back</sup> the tussock  
being made use of for shelter.  hut





H. The actual site for garden should be carefully selected  
both from point of view of quality of soil & shelter: it  
should be broken up <sup>in the autumn</sup> during the winter & fencing  
supplied. arrangements should be made to  
plant sufficient potatoes to supply the garden  
& Apples: seeds should also be supplied  
in sufficient quantity & variety to maintain a  
good supply of vegetables for the garden: if  
any vegetables can be grown for Apples  
so much the better: cabbage, cauliflower, parsnips,  
carrots, beets, onion, turnips, parsley, kale,  
spinach, beetroot, radishes, lettuce, mustard &  
cress should all be tried: also rhubarb.

He was instructed to purchase same from Mr Felton of West Point Island, should Mr Felton have such available.

It would appear that Mr Felton had such available, but was not disposed to permit of the transport of same, on account of a young bull which was to accompany the cow, having gone lame,

I would respectfully request to be informed if if this should meet with the approval of His Excellency the Governor, as no mention has hitherto been made regarding the placing of a bull upon the Elephant Jason Island.
