The Honourable The Colonial Secretary, Stanley. Institute, has been collected and is at present awaiting shipment to the United Kingdom.

5. The seals, from which this trial shipment of oil was produced, were taken between the middle of June and the end of August and the average production of oil was 2.5 gallons per seal but no information is available as to the eges of the seals taken.

6. Endeavour has also been made both in England and the United States of America to find a market for the pelts of the sea lion but, so far, without success.

Sir,

With reference to your letter of the 18th of February. I an directed by the Covernor to inform you that this Government has had under consideration the question of undertaking the production of oil from sea lions on a commercial scale but that no decision has yet been taken in the matter.

2. With the object of escertaining the value of the oil for commercial purposes samples were sent to the Imperial Institute for examination and the report on them is published at page 2 of the Gazette for 1924.

3. The seals, from which these samples of oil were produced, were taken in October; the seals were males under one year old and the average production of oil was 1.83 gallons per seal. At the time the seals were taken the opinion was expressed that if the seals were taken earlier in the year the average production of oil would be greater.

4. A trial consignment of 100 barrels of oil, as suggested in the report from the Imperial

Institutei
