I have the honour to refer to my Confidential despatch of the 25th of June, 1950, on the subject of the British Seeling Industries Limited's proposed bair seeling operations in the Falklands, and to state that I am informed by Tr. Meeler, one of the Research Officers ongaged in the "Discovery" investigations, that in 1925 the Government Stock Inspector, acting apparently under orders, undertook on expedition to the Volunteer weeks for the purpose of killing sea liens in the interests of the fur seals. It is represented to me that this expedition was of doubtful expediency, and was conducted in a very unsatisfactory manner. The carcases of the sea lions are reported to have been left to decay on the Hocks, and no doubt foulad thom. Ir. hooler is of the opinion that the sound of the firing would possibly, and may actually, have resulted in the fur seals leaving the Rocks in alarm and failing to return. As far as the proservation of fur seals is concerned. I am advised that it would be better for a licensed company to take the sea lions for oil and hides, and so remove them bodily.

My Lord,

With reference to Your Lordship's Confidential despatch of the 22nd of April, 1931, I have the honour to state that as I am advised at present, for example by Mr. J. E. Hamilton of the "Discovery" expedition, I do not consider it to be either necessary or expedient to take any measures to kill sea lions in the interests of the fur seals.

2. I have to add that in the event of it appearing desirable at a future date to take such measures I agree in the view expressed by Your Lordship that it would be better, if practicable, for the sea lions to be bodily removed and utilised but that I cannot at the same time restrain a doubt as to whether it is wholly prudent to permit, even under supervision, commercial operations for the killing of sea lions at or near the fur seal rookeries.
