I understand that Sea Leopards are protected. The diver engaged from Montevideo refused to dive for the wool lost at Fox Bay owing to their presence. Capt.Adair reported that as soon as a boat was lowered on "Fitzroy's" arrival there on 10th inst. a leopard appeared and one or two remained around "Fitzroy" that and the next day.

The Manager of the Sealing Company also reports as to their prevalence as does a man who occasionally fishes around Stanley. I therefore beg to suggest that the question of protecting Sea Leopards be re-examined with a view to Government granting permission for a certain number to be killed annually.
