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# Young Islanders score top university honours

THE ranks of qualified, dedicated young people with skills relevant to the Islands were boosted this weck as seven more university students from the Falklands celebrated their results.

Kimberley Finlayson had good reason to celebrate having achieved first class honours with her BSc (Hons) in Applied Biomedical Science, a degree which is accredited by the Institute of Biomedical Science (IBMS).

Kimberley explained that during her third year she carried out all the necessary training in a National Health Service laboratory at the Manchester Royal Infirmary bacteriology department, in accordance with IBMS standards to work in laboratories.

With her degree completed she has now received a certificate of competency, and has just sent off her application for registration with the Health Professions Council (HPC).

Kimberley said once they had processed this she would officially be a state registered biomedical

But there will be no time for her to rest on her laurels. She is now working part-time as a medical laboratory assistant while applying for jobs in the NHS as a biomedical scientist.

She told the Penguin News: "I'm looking to work in a microbiology department as this is the area that really interests me, and I want to continue with my training and specialise in this area.

"Although I would very much like to come home to work I feel that it is important to gain as much experience as possible in these busy UK labs first, and there's still a lot I can learn.'

Kimberley's interest in this area was first sparked when she was doing her A levels at Peter Symonds College: "I had an extremely good biology teacher and, during the course of my degree, l

discovered that it is a massively interesting branch of science with constant new developments in investigating disease and new treatments.

Zoran Zuvic meanwhile has also made his family extremely proud graduating from the University of Southampton with a Bachelor of En-

gineering degree, with honours in Civil Engineering. Zoran, who is currently competing with the Falkland Islands

Bisley in the UK, will soon be making his way back to the Islands to take up a contract until December as an Engineering Assistant with Colas Ltd on Project Shackleton, for the refurbishment of the runway at Mount Pleasant.

"This was a great opportunity to gain some on-site engineering experience while I am fresh out of university and get involved with a project important

to the Falklands," said Zoran. He is also looking forward to spending some time at home after five years studying in the UK.

After that he plans to do a bit of travelling and also finish off the final selection stages to join the Royal Marines in September next year.

He said: "It's a lifelong ambition, inspired by the Marines who liberated us in 1982."

But ultimately Zoran wants to settle in the Falklands just as soon as is practicable.

He said: "I just want to get some experience in the Marines first before moving back to start contributing to the community."

Defence of the Islands is something Zoran has always been passionate about, and if there's ever a chance of taking up a post in the FIDF, he said, "that would be

But with both feet firmly on the ground Zoran now has an engineering background to fall back on: "With future developments, I think there will always be jobs in the Islands for that line of work. I think my degree is relevant and can be put to good use in the Falk-lands."

Zoran said he would like to thank the Falkland Islands Govemment for their generous support throughout his studies: "The fi-nancial backing is second to none,"

Matthew Strange has also achieved a 2:1 BSc (Hons) in Business Management. Other students who have graduated are Christopher Cant, Gillian Cotter, Ashley Jaffray and Laura Street. At the time of going to print the Education Department was awaiting pennission from the students for their results to be published.

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# Airstrips take off for outer islands

RESIDENTS of Beaver. West Point and New Island are hopeful they will once again be able to fly FIGAS, after Cllr Roger Edwards met with the Public Services Department on Wednesday.

The runways on the three islands have had flights suspended since May 2008, when Air Safety Support International (ASSI) decided the runways were not long enough to meet the appropriate standard.

Cllr Edwrds said he hoped the process of extending the runway on Beaver could start soon. It was planned to ship machinery and some materials to the island on July

11 although, Cllr Edwards said, no final decision had been taken.

Approval from the Financial Secretary was awaited and an ExCo paper, to approve funding retrospectively, was needed.

"It's in the process and I can see no reason why it shouldn't go through," he said. "If I could organise it, it would be done

yesterday.''

Cllr Édwards said they hoped to do the same for the other two islands in due course. He said Beaver was the easiest to complete, and residents had volunteered to complete the earthworks themselves.

#### Farmers week starts

THE Rural Business Association (RBA) Farmers Week is kicking off on Monday in the Town Hall with the Rural Expo. This year there are 16 stands and displays for everyone to visit and enjoy.

The Expo runs from 9am-12pm and throughout that time there will be a complementary breakfast served from the refreshment room courtesy of the Meat Company and the RBA. After lunch, and throughout the week, there will be a variety of presentations and workshops.

Organiser Sarah Clement of Sealed PR said there were sessions with FIDC, FIMCO, Tourist Board, Work Boat Services and FIGAS, as well as an outing to the Power and Electrical Department and lectures on biodiversity by Falklands Conservation and the Environmental Planning office.

"All are covering a huge array of relevant subjects," she said.

#### No Kirchner challenge

CRISTINA de Kirchner chose not to challenge Falklands sovereignty with British PM David Cameron at the G20 summit in Toronto this week, instead saying the UN was the "natural environment" for negotiations.

Some commentators speculated the statement could signal a different approach to the issue, as both the Argentine president and her predecessor, husband Nestor Kirchner, had previously raised their arguments over the Falklands with Prime Ministers at every opportunity, even against protocol.

A source close to Mr Cameron said the PM was prepared to robustly defend the Falklands if he was approached by Mrs Kirchner: "He will make the point again that our position on the sovereignty of the Falklands has not changed and will not change."

#### Thorogood looks forward

CHIEF Executive Tim Thorogood says he is looking forward to working with the Legislative Assembly "over the next few years."

Councillors recently voted 5-3 in favour of extending his contract until January 2013, reversing the result of an initial show of hands.

Mr Thorogood was on holiday overseas last week and unable to comment, but he told the Penguin News this week: "I've much enjoyed working with all members of the new Assembly who I think are giving positive and practical leadership to the Islands during these challenging times. I am looking forward to working with them all over the next few years, as I am with the many excellent colleagues throughout the civil service and wider community."

# New cruise schedule confirms slump fears

THIS summer's cruise season looks set for a shaky start, judging by the first release of the tourist and expedition ship schedule.

When the first draft of the 2009/10 schedule was released on July 3 last year, a total of 35 ships were listed. This time around, only 26 have so far earmarked the Falklands on their itineraries.

The number of planned visits also has plummeted – from 101 last year to 63 this year.

And, if every ship was filled to capacity, the number of tourists setting foot on the Islands is also set to drop dramatically from a potential 90,729 last year to 52,713 this year

The early season figures are only an indicator, of course, but those indications for the upcoming season were never going to be promising after the implications of the Antarctic heavy fuel ban began to sink in, together with the ripple effects of the global financial crisis.

Ratified last July by the International Maritime Organisation, the ban seeks to prevent vessels using or carrying heavy fuel oils in favour of the more environmentally friendly marine gas oil, a lighter distillate fuel which evaporates quickly and burns more cleanly – but costs twice as much as its heavier counterparts.

Most cruise liners carrying upwards of 500 passengers are thought to be affected by the ban.

As a result of the new fuel rules and other economic factors, 18 ships which were on last year's schedule to visit the Falklands do not appear on the current list.

The most significant of these is the 2,359 capacity Norwegian Sun, with ten visits originally planned for 2009/10. The loss of the super liner has been estimated to cost £1 million to the Islands' economy, slashing local cruise income by a third.

Among others missing from this summer's schedule are the Oceanic (1,500), Fram (500), Princess Daphne (500) and Minerva

(335), which had the potential to bring in 5,675 passengers over 11 visits. Altogether, these 18 ships were last year primed to make 51 visits, with a cumulative capacity of 33,391.

Local shipping agents and marketers have worked hard to bring in new custom, and have succeeded in so far attracting nine ships which did not visit last year, including the 1,950 capacity Aurora, and the 1,339 capacity AIDAcara.

However, these nine ships plan only a total of 15 visits with a combined capacity of 8,656 – recouping barely 25 per cent of custom brought in by those which appear to have withdrawn.

Of the 17 vessels which do plan to return, the Star Princess (3,102) will be the most welcome, capable of carrying 18,612 passengers during six stopovers.

Also coming back are the Veendam (1,350), which plans nine visits, Infinity (4,898) and Insignia (824), which both plan two visits, and the Crystal Symphony (1,010) with one trip planned. Smaller ships due to make multiple visits are the Hanseatic (194), Bremen (184), Prince Albert II (132), Plancius (110), Clipper Adventurer (110) and Polar Pioneer (56).

Those returning plan to make a total of 48 visits carrying up to 44,057 passengers. Last year the same ships made 50 visits with a potential payload of 57,338.

Comparative figures for those ships capable of carrying more than 1,000 passengers indicate the

Islands can expect up to 39,959 passengers from 20 visits during the season ahead. But this, too, compares poorly with last year, when the bigger ships were planning 28 visits carrying up to 64,843 passengers.

Whatever way the figures are interpreted, this coming summer will be far from plain sailing for the local cruise industry and those hoping to benefit from it.

Tourist Board General Manager Paul Trowell told the Penguin News on Wednesday his figures indicated a year-on-year fall in cruise arrivals of more than 16 per cent "mainly due to the withdrawal of the Norwegian Sun and Minerva."

He said the heavy fuel ban also might be beginning to impact on visitor numbers, with industry experts having last year anticipated a decline from 15,531 to 6,400 passengers visiting Antarctic waters.

Mr Trowell emphasised the figures quoted in the schedule related only to passenger capacity: "It is important to remember these numbers are a best scenario forecast if the cruise ships manage to fill their quotas," he said.

"Around 40,000 passenger arrivals are in reality expected, compared to over 48,000 in 2009/10."

He also hoped some more of the smaller expedition ships would confirm visits in the near future.

"Early indications seem positive from the preliminary schedule, but the industry has to remember this is early days yet and passenger numbers are yet to be confirmed," said Mr Trowell.

"There are a lot of external issues out of our control that will affect cruise growth into the Falkland Islands in the future, but what I can say is that the Falkland Islands Tourist Board and many local operators are working hard to attract new markets and baild relationships with current and past cruise companies to assure we stay on their radar."

#### Shipped off

CONTINUED pressure from Argentina on shipping restrictions has resulted in the Concordia Bay having to dry dock in Montevideo rather than Punta Arenas as previously arranged. Concordia Bay leaves on July 17 and should return by August 25.

EXECUTIVE Council held a lengthy discussion last week on the long awaited Road Traffic Bill. Spokesperson Jan Cheek said it was agreed the Bill should be produced in manageable sections dealing with the most urgent items first, and any proposed legislation would be published for consultation.

#### Specialist audit

CLINICAL standards are undergoing an audit at King Edward Memorial Hospital. Director of Health and Education Services David Jenkins said specialists would conduct audits for the Phannacy and Medical Stores and GP practices.

#### Jersey hosts

JERSEY is to host the NatWest Island Games in 2015. The winning bid was announced this week at the Isle of Wight, which next hosts the biannual games in 2011. Bermuda is host in 2013.

# Punta the 'gateway to Antarctica'

PUNTA Arenas is pressing ahead with a multi-million pound development to establish itself as "the gateway to Antarctica" – just months after a similar bid was mooted for the Falklands.

The city's existing Antarctic Institute is to be rehoused in a new complex that will include offices, research laboratories and a museum dedicated to Chile's long presence in Antarctica.

Magallanes Region mayor Liliana Kusanovic said the new International Antarctic Centre would be "a world milestone."

She added "It will become an icon of the city and it will identify us as the gateway to Antarctica."

The project is anticipated to cost £20 million and construction is scheduled for 2014.

British Antarctic Survey Deputy Director Robert Culshaw floated a proposal to market the Falklands as "the gateway to Antarctica" during a visit to Stanley in February. He said BAS would be happy to supply a range of exhibits free of charge if the Falklands Government was to provide an appropriate site.

The suggestion was discussed informally with members of the Legislative Assembly, and welcomed as "a tremendous idea" by Falklands Museum manager Leona Roberts.

However, there have been no reports of the project progressing any further.

#### Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

I SHOULD make a graph of the subjects raised each month by members of the public. I suspect it would demonstrate the relative importance of domestic issues over the "big" political issues. This month various housing matters came a distant second to the proposed replacement north boundary fence for Stanley Cemetery. Unfortunately the privacy problem it was designed to solve would not have been fixed because of the relatively steep angle of ground slope. It is suggested that fast growing shrubs be planted in areas of particular sensitivity and that more seating be provided. Many who contacted me wanted the open aspect retained, so I hope that the proposed compromise will be deemed reasonable by all.

IT was encouraging to see the Director for Defence and Intelligence from the Foreign Office here so early in his term. Too often official visitors arrive (almost invariably in summer) just three or four months before they are due to move on. An early familiarisation visit is far more productive.

NO surprises from the Committee of 24, although clearly the Argentine Ministry of Foreign Affairs has noted some of the arguments we present regularly and attempted, unconvincingly, to counter them in their Foreign Minister's speech. A new accusation made in some of the coverage is that MLAs here have been implanted by the UK. An interesting theory, but I'm not quite sure how they think it was contrived.

THERE is another disappointing delay to the proposed legislation to ban smoking in enclosed public places. This time it gave way to more urgent drafting of amendments to public health legislation regarding ship sanitation certificates. I am assured that the smoking legislation will be ready for the October Legislative Assembly. Meanwhile, evidence of the success of bans in places where it has been in force for some years is growing. A study of bar workers in one US state showed improved health when they were no longer forced to be passive smokers, and heart attack rates are down in other populations just a couple of years post ban. # FCO chief reaffirms defence commitment

Can you describe your responsibilities, specifically in regard to the Falklands?

I have the responsibilities for the Overseas Territories Directorate in the Falklands, the policies responsibility for the Falklands and for the Americas. I also have responsibility for defence and intelligence in the Foreign Office.

What exactly prompted this visit – surely it is not a coincidence that you are here at the same time that Argentina is rattling its sabre a little more energetically than usual on the world stage?

I wanted to come very early on in my time because I think the Foreign Secretary has already shown how committed he is to the Falklands, how interested the new government is, what a long history it has of association with the Falklands. The Foreign Secretary himself visited not that long ago when he was in opposition, and it's important I think to send early on a message of reassurance that the government is completely committed to the Falklands, to the selfdetermination of the people of the Falklands. I hope that goes without saying, but it's worth saying anyway. And, as you say, there has been a period of tension, so it's important to get that message across early

The UN Decolonisation
Committee has unanimously approved a resolution calling on Argentina and the UK to resume negotiations on sovereignty. Argentina has extensive support from its neighbours and claims "world consensus" on the issue is building. How do you see this situation panning out?

I'm new to the job, but my impression is that this resolution happens every year. It's not new. I don't get the sense that the international climate is shifting or the support is building. This is something we seem to have to go through every year, but the British Government's position on sovereignty hasn't changed and won't change.

Argentine air restrictions have long been a thorn in the side for the Falklands. Do you envisage the situation ever being remedied, or at least a compromise being made?

The short answer is I don't know. At the moment, obviously, the atmosphere is probably not right for that. It's too tense. But I think we all hope that in the future a more sensible and constructive approach can be had from Argentina.



#### Quote Unquote

Tony Curran talks with Robert Hannigan, Director General for Defence and Intelligence at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office

The recent shipping restrictions imposed by Argentina are a real concern for local suppliers. How can Argentina be allowed to implement these restrictions on a whim and not be politically challenged?

Well, of course, we have challenged Decree 256, and the government did that very soon after coming to office. And we have made our position clear. We don't approve of it, we don't think it's legal, and we will wait and see what impact it actually has on the Islands. But anything which restricts trade and supply, is a bad thing.

Aside from reinforcing the "rights, preferences and sovereignty of the Falklands," as Nick Clegg said last week, what does the UK propose to do to reassure those living in the Falklands of their future safety and security?

I think the reassurance should come from the statement, as you have said, of the Deputy Prime Minister, also of the Defence Secretary in the Commons earlier this week, and of the Foreign Secretary and, indeed, of the Prime Minister, that we are committed to the defence of the Falklands, we remain committed, and we will do what is necessary to defend the Falklands, and that means the necessary force levels.

What is the UK doing to help the Falklands protect and develop its fishing and hydrocarbon industries?

I spent the afternoon talking to officials on both subjects, actually, very interesting briefings. We obviously think it's a very great pity that Argentina has taken the line that it has taken on both issues. It's self-defeating. We hope that will change in the future. That doesn't mean hydrocarbons exploration isn't going to go ahead. Of course it will. That is a matter for the Falkland Islanders to pursue.

Is the British Government of the opinion that the increase in rhetoric by the Argentine Government is partly a result of them trying to shield their domestic problems?

There has certainly been speculation in the press but, from our point of view, it's better to comment on what's happening rather than the motivation of it. That's what matters. It's a pity it is happening, whatever the motivation may be.


Who have you been meeting with on this visit, and what are the issues they have raised?

We had a reception last night and I saw a whole range of people from across the Islands, which was very interesting. Today I started off seeing the MLAs and then saw some of the government officials. I met with the Chamber of Commerce at lunchtime and more officials this afternoon, and a number of themes have emerged. Obviously uppermost in everybody's minds are the tensions with Argentina, but also the huge potential and excitement around hydrocarbons. Equally a feeling that we need to plan in a sense for two futures - one with hydrocarbons and one without - and obviously the economic challenges of the second are greater. But they are challenges we are facing too in the UK, so there are some common themes around public spending and taxation that are quite interesting. But understandably a lot of the focus is on the tension with Argentina and the effect of the restrictions on shipping - Decree 256 we have already mentioned - and we had very good discussions about that and about the way forward and how best to tackle that tension.

So, to underline the commitment of the British Government, the Falklands will not be affected negatively by the defence review?

That's right. The commitment to the defence of the Falklands is complete, and we will do what is necessary. But we never comment on force levels. It is not sensible to do so.

Mr Hannigan took up his post two months ago. He was interviewed at Government House on Friday, during his first visit to the Islands.

# MLA delegates play hardball at the UI

EMMA Edwards has challenged the United Nations Decolonisation Committee to support human rights ahead of politics in its deliberations over the Falklands.

In a hard-hitting speech in New York on Friday, Councillor Edwards vigorously defended Falkland Islanders' rights to selfdetermination, criticised Argentina for not acting on its own claims to support human rights in its arguments over the Islands, and assured members the Falklands were a free and democratic country that was not dependent on the UK.

On the issue of oil exploration she said the Falklands and Argentina could work together, and that if Argentina would cooperate on the issue of hydrocarbons, then the whole of the southern region of South America could benefit.

But she emphasised: "Any revenues from this industry will go to the people of the Falkland Islands. Not to the United Kingdom, as Argentina seems to be suggest-

ing in the world press.

The resources are those of the people of the Falkland Islands and the words being spoken by the Argentine Government strike me of a colonial suitor eyeing up their neighbour's resources.

It is time for Argentina to recognise the agreements that we have signed with them in the past. All too often the Falkland Islands gives ground on issues in agreements, only to find Argentina reneges on their side of the deal."

But she reserved some of her strongest words for committee members themselves: "Why was

this committee originally set up by the United Nations?" she said.

"To protect the rights of people or the rights of nations to argue over the sovereignty of land? Does the Decolonisation Committee really consider that the Falkland Islands are simply a group of rocks to be traded between two large sovereign world powers regardless of the wishes of the people who live on those rocks?

Cllr Edwards argued that the original spirit of the Decolonisation Committee was to help small colonised territories to stand up for their rights: "It was about sup-porting people and not supporting empire building," she said.

"Why then are the Falkland Islands considered a 'special and particular colonial situation' by the **Decolonisation Committee?** 

Why then, when we come before you, telling you what we want for our people, expressing our right to determine our future, does this not happen?

"Why do so many of the countries represented on this committee not listen to the wishes of the Falkland Islanders when they express their right to self-determination? The answer is politics.

She said Argentina's policy was clear: "It wishes to claim a piece of real estate against the wishes of the people who have lived there for almost 200 years and, because of politics, so many of this committee will support Argentine empire building. How can you support this when it goes against what the Decolonisation Committee stands for?"

She added: "Self-determination is a basic human right. It is a moral argument. It is the right thing to do. You have the power to influence which argument wins within the UN - politics or human rights.'

Cllr Gavin Short also addressed the committee, urging new Argentine Foreign Minister Hector Timerman to champion the human rights of Falkland Islanders as enthusiastically as he had of others.

He said the Falklands would like nothing better than to have a peaceful coexistence with Argentina, and agreements on fisheries and hydrocarbons were signed after the 1982 invasion.

'However, as often happens in Argentina, the pragmatism was flung aside and the aggressive posturing returned," he said.

Cllr Short said Islanders had formed their own identity over the past 177 years, and he challenged the myths perpetrated by Argentina to support its "totally un-founded and illegal claim to my Islands.

But he was saddened that independence for the Falklands remained elusive: "Some of us have spoken and dreamt of the day when we might become independent," he said. Eddie Andersen Stanley Last week's missing link, featuring a Catalina flying boat, attracted considerable interest from readers.

Gerald Cheek told us the picture was of a Canso, the amphibian version of the Catalina, and that two Cansos had visited the Islands during the late 1950s in order to photograph the Falklands and the Antarctic Peninsula for the purpose of producing new maps.

He said the aircraft were based at Deception Island doing the photographic surveys over the Peninsula and, during the Falklands survey, they were based in Stanley Harbour, moored opposite the old Beaver Hangar.

Howie Peck agreed. He said both aircraft, the CF-IGJ (Captain Chris Gavin-Rotsinson) and CF-IJJ (Captain Jim Greenshields), departed Toronto on November 26 1955. Flying Via Nassau, Trinidad, Belem, Salvador, Rio de Janeiro and Montevideo, they arrived in Stanley on December 31, continuing to Deception Island on January 10 1956.

Once there, they met up with their support vessel, the converted Danish ship Oluf Sven, which had arrived a month earlier with her cargo of accommodation and workshop buildings, aircraft spares and fuel, plus two Sikorsky S51 helicopters.

Howie said in the second season the same two aircraft departed Toronto on September 23 1956, arriving in the

Falklands on October 15, five weeks before Oluf Sven.

During the next eight weeks, during which only eight

days were suitable for aerial photography, they succeeded in photographing the entire 4,600-plus square miles of the Islands.

He said some Kelpers might remember the prints laid out on the Town Hall dance floor.

The Islands were successfully covered with "vertical" photography at a negative scale of 1/25000, which is approximately 2.5 inches to 1 mile.

Martyn Benson also recognised the aircraft. He said the two aircraft in the Falklands were operated by Hunting

Aero Surveys of Canada, on behalf of the Falkland Islands Dependencies Aerial Survey Expedition.

One of the aircraft, the CF-IGJ, he said, was owned by the Province of Newfoundland and Labrador from 1965, where it flew as

a tanker number two water bomber.

It crashed during a forced landing in Sherbrooke, Quebec on December 19 1980 and was struck off in August 1981.

# Farmers resist new tag system

IN 2002 it was mooted that if European Union (EU) accreditation to export beef from the Falklands to the EU was to be achieved a robust cattle tagging and move-ment record system would have to be put in place.

Eight years on some farmers are resisting the move and more work is needed to get them on board, said Councillor Roger Edwards at the Agricultural Advisory Committee on Tuesday.

Cllr Edwards said he had re-

ceived many calls from farmers who were "disheartened and anti" about adopting a new system.

Veterinary Officer Zoe Luxton said she was disappointed that those who needed reassurance about the reasoning behind introducing the system had not got in contact with her and welcomed calls from anyone who had reser-

More than 24 farms are fully registered and use a tagging and movement system.

Meat Company Manager John Ferguson said he had lost at least one major supplier of quality cattle because the farmer did not wish to implement the system and that there would be a shortfall of cattle over the next few months.

He said he appreciated the department's efforts, but it had caused problems for FIMCO.

There is no law in place at the moment so farmers can do their own thing," he added.

Goose Green Manager Keith

Alazia said although it created a lot of extra work, a tagging system was being put in place on his farm and he recognised the need for traceability. However, he questioned the overall need for it, saying: "The door to the entire Falklands will be shut if there is a disease problem, regardless of which farm the cattle originated from.

The current branding of cattle was sufficient for farm origin to

be traced, he said.

Miss Luxton said it was a transition period and as such all were difficult: "As calves are tagged the job will become much easier. We want people to understand and embrace the system as it is slowly phased in.

'If beef export happens it will be for the good of the Falklands. said Miss Euxton, a sentiment echoed by Cllr Glenn Ross.

#### PRINCIPAL COMPLAINTS COMMISSIONER

Applications are sought for the post of Principal Complaints Commissioner.

Chapter IX of the new Constitution provided for the appointment of Complaints Commissioners from time to time to investigate complaints of maladministration in government and any other matters prescribed by Ordinance. The Complaints Commissioners Ordinance 2010 prescribed the functions, powers and jurisdiction of Complaints Commissioners and also provided for the appointment of a Principal Complaints Commissioner.

The appointment of a Principal Complaints Commissioner will be a major step in ensuring the good governance of the Falkland Islands. It will provide a further avenue of complaint once existing avenues have been exhausted, will allow an independent check to ensure that complaints have been handled properly and fairly, and will provide for a greater degree of transparency in the complaints process, where appropriate.

Complaints Commissioners will be entitled to a daily attendance allowance when engaged on their functions. No-one can be appointed as a Complaints Commissioner if they are a member of the public service or the Legislative Assembly.

Those wishing to apply for the post of Principal Complaints Commissioner should write to the Governor at Government House by Friday 23 July with their name, address and contact details, the nature of their current employment, and a brief explanation of their reasons for applying and the skills that they would bring to the post.

#### FIH remains confident

FALKLAND Islands Holdings was "keeping its fingers crossed" for a major oil find, managing director John Foster said last Wednesday.

The company has an 8.2 per cent stake in Falkland Oil and Gas Limited, which is expecting to announce the results of initial drilling around the Islands shortly.

FIH saw pre-tax profits rise from £2.3million to a better-thanexpected £2.7million for the year to March, partly bolstered by the influx of oil workers to the Islands.

"The drilling results next week will affect our shares but FOGL has other prospects," said MrFoster. "It is working with BHP Billiton to drill wells in deeper water."

Chairman David Hudd said the group had performed well in extremely tough market conditions: "Whilst we expect the forthcoming year to be challenging, we are confident that the diversity of the group's portfolio places it in a strong position to benefit in the medium term as the wider economy recovers."

FIH expects its performance to be negatively impacted due to a disappointing illex catch, increases in freight costs and reduced numbers of cruise passengers.



The Falklands team, all entered in the Clubman class, consisted of Dereck Jaffray, his seventh time at the Welsh, riding a 250cc two-stroke KTM, Shane Blackley (his third), riding a new 2011 Yamaha YZF450 motocrosser, converted to enduro specs, Jay Moffatt riding a new KTM 250 EXCF four-stroke and Sean Moffatt riding a KTM 250 two-stroke, both in their first Welsh.

ET James provided free workshop facilities for the boys to prepare their bikes, proving to be an invaluable asset as the testing terrain was hard on the bikes as well as the riders, and reliability was a key factor in completing the course.

Day one and the forecast was not good - hot and dry, unusual for the Welsh as normally the event attracts lots of rain. The dry conditions would even the playing field for some of the less experienced riders, making the event ever more competitive.

It also made it more hazardous. due to the zero visibility of the dust storms created by bikes being ridden wide open by heat crazed Enduro riders. Sean, who had been riding flat out down a fire road, in the power band, overshot a tight turn due to the very dusty conditions.

He managed to make the turn just before a very steep descent into oblivion, then witnessed a rider making the same mistake, just missing Sean and disappearing into a cloud of dust, never to be seen again.

were so steep the tracks had to have very sharp switch back bends. Jay witnessed one rider who didn't make one of the turns and careered down the hillside at a great rate of knots. The paramedics who eventually found him had to bandage up a very dodgy looking hand.

One hazardous check point, located on the wrong side of the brow of a hill, saw a rider come hammering in, brakes screeching and rocks flying as he scattered patiently queuing riders like pins in a Supporter Kelly Moffatt bowling alley.

As the day wore on and the riders wore out, the Falklands boys continued to make all the check points on time but not without the odd drama here and there.

The special tests, of which there were three placed strategically along the route, consisted of one lap of a motocross type circuit, which you had to ride as quickly as possible.

Riders started at intervals a few seconds apart, which proved to be one of Jay's downfalls as he got stuck behind a slow rider and lost at least ten places in his overall position. Lesson learned, he did not make the same mistake again.



## Reducing risk of falls

The Falklands Health Promotion Group presents a series of columns aimed at making our lives longer, safer and healthier. This week it again looks at fall prevention...

THE risk of falling increases as we get older and represents more than half of hospital admissions for accidental injury among older people in the UK. The risk in the Falklands increases with the

strong winds, ice and snow, and the steep hills. What to do if you fall:

1. Get help if you can. Try to attract attention, use your personal call alarm if you have one, or call 999 if you can reach a phone.

2. If you can't get help and you are not hurt, try to get up. The easiest way to do this is to roll onto your hands and knees and crawl to a sturdy piece of furniture. Put your hands on a chair or bed and bring up one leg, bending your knee and placing your foot flat on the floor. Lean forwards and bring the other foot up so that it is flat on the floor and you are crouching. Turn and sit on the bed or chair. Rest for a while before you try and stand up.

3. If you are hurt or can't get up, try and keep yourself warm by covering yourself with a coat or anything else you can find. Keep tensing your arm and leg muscles and roll from side to side if you can to keep moving. If you have fallen on to a hard floor try to crawl to a softer carpeted area if possible.

garden, or advice with regard to adaptations, please contact the District Nursing team by calling 28083 and leaving an answer phone message.

# Cubs hoedown for a Wild West weekend


STANLEY Scout Hut was transformed into the Wild West for the Cub Scouts annual winter sleepover at the weekend



The other teams choose their fabrics and I hardly see some of them for the rest of the day, except when their sewing skills defeat them. I love the optimism of


youth but, nevertheless, there is a persistent niggle at the back of my mind that the whole thing could fall flat on its face.

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

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

## Show bags a bundle of laughs

FARMERS Week is predominantly about sharing ideas, finding solutions and broadening horizons... but it's also about having fun. # Input sought on Islands' new economic blueprint

THE Economic Development Strategy for the Falklands - a culmination of two years work between the public and private sectors in the Islands – has finally been released for public consultation.

Part A of the strategy was discussed in September last year, detailing where the Islands economy stood at present.

Part B – the document which looks at "where the islands want to go, and how we go about getting there" – is the blueprint perhaps most likely to shape the next 25 years.

Now, as a two-month public consultation process kicks off, the Falkland Islands Government is urging people to offer feedback.

The EDS contains input from the private sector and the Chamber of Commerce as well as government departments, and is compiled by the Policy Unit. At a Farmers Week presentation, Councillor Dick Sawle said credit for the drive and impetus behind the EDS belonged to former council leader Mike Summers, who led the process at its launch.

Cllr Sawle said he had chosen the EDS as part of his portfolio because it became apparent to him many years ago that the economy was very dependent on the fishery, and horizons needed to be broadened.

He said also it was important to remember it was a discussion document and he hoped it would create debate.

Feedback and comments were most welcome from the public, he said, adding that at the end of the day the government spends money, but it was the private sector that was at the heart of the economy.

Senior Economist Michael Poole said the wide-ranging document was of importance to all people in the Islands as it aimed to lay out a plan for the economic development and sustainable financial future for the Islands.

"It is very much a partnership document between the private and public sector, and aims to enhance competitiveness and improve productivity as a means to raising Islanders' standards of living," he said. "Once finalised, it should help inform decision making in both sectors."

The EDS covers many areas including immediate issues that affect the Islands and possible growth opportunities.

To make the process as manageable as possible it was agreed that it made sense to split the economy into five main industry groups; agriculture, fisheries, tourism, services and new industries, all of which have analysed where they wish to go over the coming

years. The ultimate aim of the strategy is the identification of key priority areas for economic development and a realistic set of macroeconomic targets "in harmony with social goals laid out in the Islands Plan."

This is to be achieved by "broadening the sectors of economic activity, enlarging the enterprise base and growing external markets," says the government.

The consultation period concludes on September 10, when a group will again look at the EDS and decide on priorities for the next 12-18 months.

The final document is expected to be produced no later than October.

# Forces combine as man rescued in drama at sea

AIR Force and Navy crews joined forces in a dramatic evacuation at sea last Thursday, airlifting a sick crewman from a fishing vessel 260 miles north of the Islands.

MPA was alerted to a Mayday call from Madrid Regional Command and Control, informing them a crewman was suffering medical difficulties on board the Armastus – but the distance that had to be covered was initially outside the Sea King Search and Rescue helicopter's fuel limits.

The Sea King crew stripped the cabin of all unnecessary furnishings to increase the fuel capacity, and even the water boiler was switched off to help improve range.

With a C130 Hercules in support to provide communication links, and HMS Clyde providing a flight deck at sea, the Sea King eventually reached the Armastus and successfully winched the casualty on board, taking him to King Edward Memorial Hospital, after stopping at Cape Dolphin for refuelling.

Sea King pilot Flight Lieutenant Bob Dewes said the two-layered operation went really well: "Although it was an air-led Search and Rescue operation with support from the sea assets, everyone was involved in the planning.

"When we arrived at the vessel in distress the Hercules was already on site circling it. Seeing the Hercules and knowing HMS Clyde was around was really reassuring to us.

"It just shows that the training of the individual elements works and we can confidently come together in a time-pressured situation such as this one."

Co-pilot Flight Lieutenant Laura Hearnshaw found herself in the middle of the action just ten days after arriving on the Islands: "I'd heard about other people's long range search and rescue operations and for my first to be here and against such obstacles was fantastic," she said.

"It was such a great feeling once we'd got to the hospital and the realisation hit us that the plan had worked."

HMS Clyde, which cancelled its capability day to join the operation, remained at sea overnight on slow passage back to Mare Harbour.

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# A season of firsts for the Meat Company

DESPITE a rocky start to the season, due to poor weather affecting livestock finishing, the Meat Company has had its best season to date with turnover for the local market exceeding £300,000 for the first time.

At a meeting with farmers this week General Manager John Ferguson said despite the difficult start to the export season, from mid February to the end of the season 500 sheep had been put through each day as well as 5-6 beef each day from March.

Transporting animals from the West had worked better than the previous season he said, but there was still room for improvement.

It had been a good year for farmers, too, with abattoir suppliers receiving just over £600,000 between them.

But Mr Ferguson said the perception that the Meat Company was just another way of subsidising farmers was unjust. The financial benefits reached much further affield than farmers, with Stanley businesses receiving £398,000 the government receiving £120,000 and £379,000 paid to locally employed staff, injecting over £1.5 million into the local economy.

A government operating subsidy of £410,000 had been received, and the aim was to keep

reducing this figure as much as possible, but not to the detriment of payments to farmers. Mr Ferguson said it was "for the politicians to decide" if the money had been well spent: "But there are a lot of people who have benefitted from the operation."

Another first for the Meat Company was the trial export of manufacturing and older beef.

He said there were no issues with the quality of beef now: "The only problem now is supply."

Demand in the local market was on the increase and the 'mountain of mince' that had been in cold storage a year ago had been eaten up. He urged farmers to build up their beef herds with suitable animals: "The local market is

not going to go away as long as we don't screw up the quality," he said. Export of frozen processed meat in the form of stew packs had also increased, although lack of cold store space had impacted on the operation. Mr Ferguson said this was a good way of getting rid of smaller cuts with the bone in, but it meant doubling handling products and the process took up a lot of cold store space.

In the 2009/10 season 479 cattle, 22,836 sheep and 14,817 lambs were processed, as well as 85 pigs and 26 goats.

The drive to improve product volume was essential, said Mr Ferguson, and efforts to maximise sales potential and reducing operating costs would continue.

#### Making a point

RESIDENTS have been urged to contact Assembly members if they feel aggrieved by the current points system under the immigration review. Cllr Dick Sawle was told during Farmers Week that potential applicants were not applying for status because they had undertaken the test at home and discovered they were not able to earn enough points. One farmer said she had had sufficient points when she lived in Stanley, but since investing in and moving to Camp she was unable to accumulate sufficient points.

#### Freight rates

THERE are no plans to increase freight rates for consolidated cargo or to alter the "one every 35 days" routine for resupply vessels to the Falklands, the MoD has confirmed, although some cargo had been shut off the last two vessels due to preparations for the MPA runway resurfacing project. FIG is offered excess space on a standby basis only after necessary stores for the forces have been loaded.

#### Aires of anxiety

ARGENTINES are the most anxious people in Latinamerica, with eight out of ten residents admitting to suffering anxiety, and ranking among the most nervous in the world, according to a JWT Sonar public opinion poll. Issues triggering the anxiety are mostly insecurity, the economic situation and health.

#### Speeding fine

Christopher David Francis (55) was fined £320 and ordered to pay £80 costs at the Magistrate's Court on Wednesday when he admitted speeding. Mr Francis was recorded on May 19 driving a 110 Land Rover at 64mph on the Elephant Canyon stretch of the Stanley-Darwin road.

#### No free deals

GATEWAY House, the passenger accommodation block at RAF Brize Norton, no longer offers free rooms or meals for outgoing military or civilians on the Airbridge. Rooms now cost £26.40 and can no longer be booked in advance. Meals are priced from £1.19-£3.98.

#### Retrial sought

PROSECUTORS in the case of Colin George Macdonald, charged with sexual offences, intend to seek a retrial, Acting Judge John Trevaskis informed the Supreme Court on Wednesday. It is now unlikely the retrial will take place before early next year.

## When size really does matter

FISHERIES expert Dr Alexander Arkhipkin has solved a riddle which has baffled scientists for generations: how does a male deep sea squid mate with a female?

The answer, quite simply, is that it boasts an enormously long penis.

Up until recently, nobody knew how male deep sea squid managed to inseminate females because they lacked a "special arm" to help guide their potential offspring through the murky depths towards the female's reproductive organs, a process happily undertaken by shallow water cephalopods, the group containing octopus, squid and cuttlefish.


"In deep water squid we could only guess how this happens," said

Dr Arkhipkin.

But the catching of the male deep sea squid, of the species Onykia ingens, has revealed the

answer.
"Obviously a strongly elongated penis is the solution," said Dr Arkhipkin.

The squid uses its lengthy organ to reach into the body of the female, and it then injects the sperm directly, to prevent it being washed away. What also impressed Dr Arkhipkin and his team

was that the male squid's sexual organ was almost as long as its whole body, including the squid's mantle, head and arms.

Dr Arkhipkin, based at the government Fisheries Department, described his discovery after details were published in the Journal of Molluscan Studies.

"The mature male squid was caught during a deep water research cruise on the Patagonian

slope.
"We took the animal from the catch, and it was moribund with arms and tentacles still moving, and chromatophores on the skin contracting and expanding," he told the RBC.

"When the mantle of the squid was opened for maturity assessment, we witnessed an unusual event.

"The penis of the squid, which had extended only slightly over the mantle margin, suddenly started to erect, and elongated quickly to 67cm total length, almost the same length as the whole animal."

The squid's sexual agitation caught the researchers by surprise. But it at least shot down one old wives' tale from the deep: "Some authors hypothesised that the giant squid 'shoot' their spermatophores hydraulically from distance to the females," said Dr Arkhipkin

"Obviously our findings show that the reproductive habits of giant squid may be bizarre, but not to that extent."

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly



# Port Harriet emerges as favourite new site

PORT Harriet has been suggested as the favoured site for a new port by consultants - but it has not been agreed by local mariners, and the government still does not have a favoured site.

Stanley Harbour is the less costly alternative in the latest report to be released to the public, although Assembly members emphasise there has been no further shortlisting and all options are being given due consideration.

The draft final report on the new port project, prepared by Royal Haskoning, as well as an abridged business case by Raymond Burke Consulting, are now available from the Development Corporation on disk.

It's a weighty tome of plans, projections, technical and business advice which concludes that the development of a new port would be a positive step to providing a "catalyst for change and modernisation that will be of benefit to Falkland's society, now and in the future."

The case for the development of a new port is driven primarily by the importance of the fisheries sector to the Falklands economy and the need to support and grow it, particularly for local companies.

The new port would, according to the report, "effect transformational change on the sector bringing new ways of doing work and activity to the Islands."

Whether for or against a new port, the fact remains that with a short life expectancy for the floating dock FIPASS, the Islands could be without an operational port within five to ten years - and with this in mind the "do nothing" option is not really an option.

"It would end up costing even more than building a new dock," said Councillor Dick Sawle.

"The fact is that all of the projections in the report are based on 20 years so, although FIPASS may look good compared to other options, in 20 years it would represent a major investment decision given that by that time any new port would only be about 40 per cent into its useful life, whereas any FIPASS option would be at

the end of its life and a major investment decision would be needed. We also have to remember that the whole reason for beginning this project back in 2001 with the Mott McDonald report was due to the restricted life of FIPASS, and also the restrictions it places on future operations by its very nature," said Cllr Sawle.

The listed options for a new port within the report are Port Harriet, Stanley Harbour, Navy Point and Ordnance Point.

For each of the proposed sites, four alternative construction techniques have been considered, examining suspended or solid forms of construction.

The total capital cost estimates prepared by Royal Haskoning for new ports at the different sites ranged from £51m to £81m.

Two improvement options for FIPASS were also considered, varying from £21m to £31m.

But there is still a lot of work to be done. Councillors intend to spend at least a year looking at metoceanic data and funding options before any final decision is made on a site.

Cllr Sawle said: "We need to look at possible EU funding and soft loans as well as the appetite for private companies to invest. The amount of funding that can be sourced will in many ways dictate site selection."

Although the reconfiguration of FIPASS is still being considered, its life expectancy would only be extended to a possible 20 years, and then it would still not supply a deep water port, or address the many logistical issues such as quay length, traffic movement and storage areas. There is no guarantee it can be returned to an "as new" condition, although a new development option would have a life span of at least 50 years.

The Stanley Harbour port would be sited close to the exist-

ing FIPASS facility and established services and infrastructure.

The existing shore facilities include an unsurfaced container yard, open warehousing and a fuel depot with surrounding FIG owned land for port expansion.

Two options have been considered for this location, both east of FIPASS with a 250 metre by 40 metre quay. Stanley Harbour is deeper than previously recorded, and offers an eight metre clearance in most areas with some localised dredging required, the report states.

While prevailing wind, tide and currents are favourable in these locations, the Narrows could cause problems in the event of failure during windy conditions, and dredging would be required to provide a depth of nine metres at low tide

Port Harriet is an undeveloped area a few miles south of Stanley, and would require a new access road. The proposed site for the port is along the north shore of Port Harriet in line with the west end tip of Mullet Creek. There are many benefits to this site, although most of the preliminary design has been based on assumptions, due to lack of information.

Cllr Sawle said it had also met with significant criticism from local mariners which had to be taken into account.

The main constraint, according to the report, is the existence of the sand bar in the approach channel to the basin, as well as mariners' and stakeholders' concerns over swell and exposure, and there is the very obvious lack of infrastructure.

Royal Haskoning has recommended that after funding options and site selection have been decided, the government should consider the benefits of establishing a Special Economic Zone (SEZ) on and adjacent to the port facility that would provide tax holidays or incentives to firms operating in the zone.

## Directors increase holdings as Rockhopper greets findings

TWO directors of Rockhopper Exploration have added to their shareholdings, days after the company confirmed its oil discovery at its Sea Lion prospect was a medium grade crude.

Executive chairman Dr Pierre Jungels has invested £69,700 in 23.350 shares at 298.5p each, which takes his shareholding to 889,424 shares. This is the first purchase by Jungels since he bought 150,000 shares at 32p each in June 2009.

Non-executive director Chris Walton bought a further 8,300 shares at 297.625p each. His investment of £24,702 takes his shareholding to 32,109 shares, and is the first time he has bought shares in more than two years.

Rockhopper announced its latest findings on Friday: "These positive results, when combined with our knowledge of reservoir quality from logging data, give us further comfort that a flow test of the Sea Lion well will confirm a mobile crude oil," said managing director Sam Moody.

"The wax content is typical for a lacustrine sourced crude oil and significantly lower than many other producing oilfields worldwide

"Furthermore the viscosity, gas oil ratio, FVF and sulphur are all better than we anticipated," he added.

Last month, Rockhopper upgraded its estimate of recoverable reserves at the Sea Lion prospect in the North Falkland Basin from 170m barrels to 242m barrels, adding it had "significant upside potential."

Meanwhile, Falklands Oil and Gas said results from its Toroa F61/5-1 well had been delayed until next week.

The company was expecting to announce preliminary results this week but blamed the hold-up on "minor operational issues and weather related downtime."

Argentina also says it is to begin exploring for oil later this year. YPF, in association with Pan American Energy and Petrobras, are reported to be targeting an area south west of the Falklands, next to the former Falklands/Argentina Hydrocarbons Cooperation Zone.

# Review sees FIGAS fly back to the future

AFTER two tourist seasons of operating a shuttle service the Falkland Islands Government Air Service is to revert to a less regimented schedule.

Councillor Sharon Halford said they had wanted to get back to the taxi service system and make best possible use of the aircraft in the most cost effective way.

Tariff increases became effective on July 1, while schedule adjustments will take effect on August 1. After a period of wide consultation the recommendations of the FIGAS strategic review board were accepted by Executive Council on June 24.

The recommendations involve a number of changes to the air service which are made with a view to

improving overall customer service and flexibility.

Both winter and summer seasons will comprise up to two early morning flights with a fixed departure time of 8.30am covering flights to all destinations and – subject to demand – a further two flights departing by midday. Provision has been made for a later flight for East to West destinations departing by 3.30pm. In addition, during the summer season only, and also subject to demand, there will be a late afternoon follow-on flight.

As announced in the budget, the capped resident fare has increased from £50 to £55, with the exception of residents on outer islands where the fare stays at £50. A review of the eligibility for sub-

sidised fares and allowances will be carried out in the coming months. In the near future this may only cover residents on the electoral roll, PRP and work permit holders. FIG and Government House staff.

To free up more capacity for freight, the baggage allowance for the capped resident fare is 14kg and 20kg for the standard fare.

But while the service is aiming to be more accommodating, late changes to bookings will cost passengers £20 if made after 10am on the day before the flight.

More changes are planned with the three separate departments of Civil Aviation, FIGAS and the Fire Section set to merge into one department, Cllr Halford said.

## Teacher: leave them kids alone

ARGENTINA'S latest bid to stir up trouble over the Falklands has been met with dismay by FICS head teacher Alastair Baldwin, after diplomats questioned the visit of Chilean students to the Islands.

A group of eight students from schools in Punta Arenas last month completed a three week stay with families in Stanley, attending the Community School as part of a programme to improve their English and gain a better understanding of the Islands.

The teacher who accompanied them, Elena Barria Ampuero, learned English while she and her husband worked in the Falklands.

According to the newspaper La Prensa Austral, Celeste Koch from the Argentine Embassy in Santiago held an "informal" exchange with Punta Arenas Mayor Vladimiro Mimica, during which she expressed Argentine disapproval of a Chilean city forging links with the Falklands.

Mr Baldwin said he was "incredibly disappointed" by the report: "It was such a positive experience for the boys and girls who visited," he told the Penguin News. "They have even emailed us to say they would love to come back. They said they were missing the school and their new friends. It's such a shame politics gets in the way."

However, Mr Baldwin said he was determined to press ahead with plans for a reciprocal visit next year, during which he hopes to see FICS students join their counterparts in Punta Arenas.

"It is so beneficial for both sets of kids," he said.

# A sterling effort from farmers

IN response to the article in last week's Penguin News "Farmers resist new tag system" it is important that the facts do not get lost in the pursuit of a controversial story.

The truth of the matter is that the majority of farms that are serious about beef production have made a sterling effort to tag and register their cattle.

Indeed, many beef farmers simply had to send in a list of their cattle as their cattle were already double tagged as part of their farms best practice cattle management.

Some farms have made a concerted effort to get their cattle tagged and registered while others are slowly and surely tagging and registering mobs as and when they get the chance.

Some eight years ago it was mooted to work towards the Falk-land Islands being able to export beef and much time and effort has been put into developing this industry.

One of the many EU requirements that the Competent Authority (Veterinary Section of the DOA) must certify to is that cattle slaughtered for export must be part of a national cattle identification and traceability scheme.

Failure to meet EU requirements will prevent access to this market and it is currently the main market.

Currently there is no FI law that requires people to double tag and register their cattle but existing laws do ask for farm identification in the form of a station mark to be applied to cattle as well as sheep.

To ensure that the Falkland Islands have a secure meat export industry in the future there will eventually be a legal requirement to tag and register all cattle to give the system validity in the eyes of the EU.

It is proposed that by 2012 all cattle in the Falklands should be tagged and registered.

This is a big ask and will require effort on the part of all farmers and people who run cattle to not let their fellow farmers down by resisting change and potentially closing down an important future income source for farmers. FIMCo and the Falkland Islands economy.

While Keith Alazia's comment the door to the entire Falklands will be shut if there is a disease problem, regardless of which farm the cattle originated from" holds some truth, the fact remains that the EU asks for cattle to be individually identified as there is a strong genetic component to the incidence of Bovine Spongiform

The reason we are asking for these practices to continue outwith of the export season is that on a more local level being able to trace the movements of cattle is invaluable if needing to follow a disease outbreak or trace back to the source of a food poisoning incident to take the appropriate action.

If someone should become very ill, or possibly even die as the result of a food poisoning incident, it would be in everyone's interest that the source of that product could be identified and the remaining livestock checked as potential carriers.

In the case of Australia and New Zealand, when compulsory identification of cattle was introduced, as well as the inevitable teething problems, cattle managers quickly realised the advantages of having numbered tagging of individual cattle for management practices.

If you are intending to make money out of your cattle you need to know the genetic parentage so you don't have inbreeding reducing your profits and you can remove those that don't regularly calve or that persistently chase you up the cattle yard rail (temperament is highly inherited).

A mob of unidentified, unhandleable beasts, including some cows which may never have had a calf, will not make money for farmers whichever way they look at it. Basically they only cost money by eating feed and wrecking fences.

Few Falkland Islands farmers have the luxury of being able to farm as a hobby and most farms must be run as profitable businesses. The emerging beef export opportunity as well as the current rapidly expanding local beef market, provide significant opportunities for the Falkland Islands.

DoA staff are always willing and available to help people with advice and we have a limited supply of cattle tags surplus to our needs if anyone can make use of them (they are numbered only, so you will still need to identify the cattle to your property).

Ring 27355 and get the facts and get on with making the beef industry in the Falklands a great one for beef consumers, farmers, FIMCo, the Taxation Department and the FI community.

# **UK Government** rejects Decree

IN response to Tim Miller's letter in last week's Penguin News, Argentine Presidential Decree on Maritime Transport (no.256/2010) requires ships to apply for "authorisation" from the Argentine Coast Guard in the following circumstances:

\* where they are travelling between ports in Argentina and ports in the Falkland Islands. South Georgia. South Sandwich Islands:

\* going through Argentine "jurisdictional waters" on the way to ports in Falkland Islands, South Georgia, South Sandwich Islands; or...

\* ships loading goods to be carried directly or indirectly to ports in Falkland Islands, South Georgia, South Sandwich Islands.

Argentine Presidential Decree 256 purports to require all ships in these circumstances to complete authorisation paperwork in Argentina

Ships may wish to enquire direct with the Argentine authorities for advice on the paperwork.

However, the UK has protested to Argentina, and has firmly rejected Decree 256.

The UK Government considers that it is not compliant with international law, including the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea.

If a vessel is affected by the Decree, the Master is advised to tell the Argentine authorities that the UK Government has firmly rejected the legality of the Decree and therefore does not recognise any requirement to comply with its provisions.

However, if Masters or owners of vessels feel compelled to comply with the Decree, the advice of the UK authorities is that they should do so only under strong protest and, at the earliest opportunity, should notify the UK authorities at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office response centre (Tel: +44 20 7008 1500, email response @fco.gov.uk).

#### Argentina plans navy patrols

ARGENTINA says it is planning to send four navy patrol vessels to the South Atlantic to "show presence and the willingness of Argentina to exercise sovereignty" over the Falklands.

Argentine Defence Minister Nilda Garre said the patrol vessels were under construction in a joint project with Chile and the

The world's first iron-hulled screw-driven ocean liner was launched in Bristol in 1843. She criss-crossed the Atlantic, made 32 runs to Australia with emigrants, served as a troop ship in the Crimean war and the Indian Mutiny, and later became a cargo ship.

The ship was eventually scuttled in the Falklands in 1937 after 50 years as a storage hulk.

She is now a museum, with more than 150,000 people visiting her in Bristol each year.

# Full life served with a constant devotion to his adopted Islands

The Rev Peter John Millam 1936-2010

PETER was born in Portsmouth on March 11 1936, the son of a Falkland Islands mother Beatrice Orissa Bender and William Robert Millam, who had served with the Royal Navy in the Falklands.

Peter married Jill in March 1960, and they had four children: Rosalind, Kevin, Sarah and Andrew, He was ordained a priest in 1964.

Peter was steeped in Falkland Islands lore as a child and met frequent guests from the Islands, so when the opportunity came to serve as senior chaplain at Christ Church Cathedral it was as if a local boy had made good.

He hit the headlines in September 1966, shortly after arriving, when he successfully dealt with 18 armed hijackers of the Condor group who had taken hostages aboard the Argentine Aerolinas DC4 plane forced to land on Stanley Racecourse.

When negotiating the release of women and children. Peter managed to smuggle Chief of Police Terry Peck on to a departing Land Rover under his clerical cloak.

On December 21 1969 Peter organised the celebrations of the consecration of Bishop Stirling as first Bishop of the Falkland Islands.

Returning to England in June 1970 Peter was a founder member of the United Kingdom Falkland Islands committee. He was the first person to broadcast to the Falkland Islands on the BBC World Service in April 1982, and read the second lesson at Falkland Islands Evensong in St Paul's Cathedral on the Palm Sunday. He spoke to a packed audience of

members of the Houses of Lords and Commons to emphasise the sacrifice the Falkland Islanders had made in the defence of Britain.

Peter was vicar of Pulloxhill with Flitton from 1970-79, where he raised money for the rebuilding of the church tower by introducing the sale of Church Ales.

He then joined St Paul's at Luton (1979-89). Chipping Campden with Ebrington (1989-94), and in 1992 he was Chaplain to the High Sheriff of Gloucester.

As a hymn writer one of his hymns "They that go to sea in

ships" was broadcast on BBC on Sea Sunday.

Peter conducted the service at HMS Protector Association reunions and each year on the Saturday closest to December 8 he conducted the service at the Cenotaph in Whitehall in remembrance of Falklands Battle Day.

On the last three occasions Peter had been allowed out of hospital for four hours to conduct the service and attend the AGM of the Falkland Islands Association.

In 1960 Peter took up a teaching post in Birmingham and, ever willing, he undertook to run an extra course on beekeeping.

Due to a mishap he suffered a coma from excessive bee stings, but treatment for this involved concentrated use of newly introduced steroids which turned out to adversely affect his health for the rest of his life.

Peter crossed the bar on June 8 and his funeral took place on June 18 at The Parish Church of St Richard, Aldwick. Peter's ashes for internment were received by the family at Chipping Campden Churchyard on Sunday July 4.

## PRINCIPAL COMPLAINTS COMMISSIONER

Applications are sought for the post of Principal Complaints Commissioner.

Chapter IX of the new Constitution provided for the appointment of Complaints Commissioners from time to time to investigate complaints of maladministration in government and any other matters prescribed by Ordinance. The Complaints Commissioners Ordinance 2010 prescribed the functions, powers and jurisdiction of Complaints Commissioners and also provided for the appointment of a Principal Complaints Commissioner.

The appointment of a Principal Complaints Commissioner will be a major step in ensuring the good governance of the Falkland Islands. It will provide a further avenue of complaint once existing avenues have been exhausted, will allow an independent check to ensure that complaints have been handled properly and fairly, and will provide for a greater degree of transparency in the complaints process, where appropriate.

Complaints Commissioners will be entitled to a daily attendance allowance when engaged on their functions. No-one can be appointed as a Complaints Commissioner if they are a member of the public service or the Legislative Assembly.

Those wishing to apply for the post of Principal Complaints Commissioner should write to the Governor at Government House by Friday 23 July with their name, address and contact details, the nature of their current employment, and a brief explanation of their reasons for applying and the skills that they would bring to the post.

# June weathers storm as the sun stays on the bright side

EVERYTHING was looking up weather-wise during June, with temperatures, rainfall and sunshine all above average.

The mean maximum temperature was 5.3 Celsius compared with an average for June of 4.5C. The highest temperature recorded was 9.5C on the 1st and the lowest maximum was 0.1C on the 7th. The mean minimum was 1.2C, compared with the 0.5C average. The lowest minimum was -5.9C on the 19th and the highest minimum was 7.3C on the 11th.

Total rainfall was 68mm, higher than the average of 56.5mm. The wettest day was the 18th with a total of 16.1mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 23 days and 1mm

or more fell on 12 days. There were 66.8 hours of sunshine, compared with the average of 60.5 hours. The highest daily total was 6.1 hours on the 26th.

There were 11 days when sleet or snow fell, and snow lay at 9cm on 11 days, slightly below average. There were five days of hail which is average, no days with fog and one day of thunder.

The monthly mean wind speed was 13.5 knots, against an average of 13.3. The highest hourly mean speed of 37 knots occurred on the 9th and the highest recorded gust of 56 knots occurred on the 18th. Gales occurred on three days and there were 14 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots.

# UK media: Will he or won't he?

REPORTS that Prince William wants to serve in the Falklands have resurfaced in the British press.

According to the Mail on Sunday, the Prince is "battling" to come to the Falkland Islands next year as an RAF Search and Rescue helicopter pilot.

William, 28, finishes his training in the autumn and the paper says he is due to travel to the Falklands for eight weeks next northern summer

But there is a huge question mark over whether Buckingham Palace will let him take up the post.

A source told the newspaper: "He will try everything in his power to make sure he goes out there with the rest of RAF Valley in Anglesey.

"He has royal engagements and other official duties, and that has to be considered, but he is adamant that he is going."

If he does, William would be following in the footsteps of his uncle, Prince Andrew, who was a helicopter pilot in the 1982 Falklands War.

But with Argentina making increasingly loud noises at various international gatherings over its sovereignty claims, William may be held back from heading our way.





# Research vindicates a pioneering campaign

When doctors in the UK began bowel screening trials in 1994, medical staff in the Falklands were so impressed with its theory and simplicity, they decided to go straight ahead with a campaign proper. Results from the UK trials recently published now show not only that screening can reduce death from bowel cancer by more than 40 per cent, but it also vindicates the pioneering work conducted in the Falklands 16 years ago. Dr Barry Elsby reports...

IT was in 1994 that we first set up the Islands' Bowel Screening campaign.

The original motivation for the campaign was the realisation that there were a number of families in the Islands with a very high incidence of bowel cancer.

Bowel cancer is the third most common form of cancer worldwide, and is known to start from simple fleshy lesions on the bowel wall called polyps.

These polyps grow slowly over the years and can become cancerous.

This pre-cancerous phase means that we are able to offer members of these higher risk families regular colonoscopies, ie fibre optic examination of the whole large bowel.

If any polyps are seen they can be painlessly removed during the examination and so cannot develop into cancer.

Unfortunately, in these higher risk families, new polyps can grow anywhere in the large bowel, and so we need to repeat these examinations every few years.

Members of these families also start forming polyps at much younger ages, often in their mid 20s, as compared with the people who have no family history.

People may remember that we also had a visit from a consultant geneticist and genetic nurse counsellor.

Members of high risk families were seen and most had blood samples taken for genetic analysis.

The hope was that we could identify a specific gene responsible for causing the bowel cancer in these families and then offer family members a test to see if they carried the gene.

If they had the gene then lifelong screening would be necessary, but if they did not carry the gene then they would not be at higher risk and so would only need testing in later life.

This genetic research identified one family with a gene responsible for their high risk.

This family and their children have been offered blood tests to see if they have the gene and thus are at high risk.

Unfortunately, no gene was identified in the other families and so we have to assume that they are all at higher risk and continue to screen them with colonoscopies.

People not in these family groups are still at risk of bowel cancer but not until later in life, typically in their 60s and 70s.

Research has shown that these ordinary people do not start to form polyps until they are in their late 40s, and that all the polyps they will form in their life have developed by their mid 50s, giving ten years or more for some to become cancerous.

Also, the vast majority of these polyps, and thus of subsequent cancers, form on the left side of the large bowel, meaning that it is much easier to find and remove them.

In 1994, a large trial was started in the UK involving over 170,000 people to see if a simple "one off" examination of the left side of the colon, and removal of any polyps found when a person was 56 years of age, would lead to a reduction in later bowel cancer.

The trial needed to continue for over 15 years to be sure of showing a difference.

The theory and simplicity of this trial was so convincing that we decided to start screening our non high risk people in this way in 1994 rather than wait for the trial to report.

Our statistics show that we have seen a significant fall in the

incidence of bowel cancer since we started this screening examination, and our experience was published in the British Cancer Journal a few years ago.

The trial started in the UK in 1994 and finally reported in the Lancet medical journal in April this year

It showed that this simple "one off" examination at the age of 56 reduced the death from bowel cancer by more than 40 per cent – a huge figure.

Similar trials are still going on in Italy and the United States and are due to report in the next year or so.

However, it is clear from the results of the UK trial that this exam is very effective at preventing cancer and deaths.

Although this trial has shown a huge benefit, one might ask why has it not produced the higher reduction predicted by the theorists.

Part of the answer to this might be that some of the non screened control group in the trial have yet to develop symptoms of the cancers that are slowly growing in their bowel.

Thus, it would be expected that, as the years go by, the screening test will be shown to be more and more effective.

Also, in the 16 years since the trial was started, the equipment used to see the inside of the colon has improved dramatically; a bit like watching a 12-inch black and white TV then and now having a 48-inch HD colour set.

We are now able to see 2mm diameter polyps that might have been missed before.

Britain and other countries will now have to decide if they wish to start such a screening programme in their countries.

The problem they will face is the lack of people sufficiently well qualified to undertake the examination.

The Falklands has developed the expertise to undertake this screening locally, but many will be aware that we are now almost two years behind in our screening.

This has come about from a combination of an increased need to examine patients with acute abdominal pain or bleeding, etc. as a priority, together with increasing budgetary constraints.

The Health Department regards this service as a priority and is actively considering ways to reduce the backlog of persons needing to be screened with the aim of reducing it to nil.

With the evidence from this UK trial now available, everyone is strongly encouraged to take up their invitation for screening when they receive it.



The Falklands Health Promotion Group continues its series of columns aimed at making our lives longer, safer and healthier. This week the focus is on keeping your child safe indoors...

CHILDREN need to explore their surroundings. Their natural curiosity enables them to learn about their environment, but with a limited sense of danger. Take a good look at your home through the eyes of your child – at their level – to see what they see.

Cups of coffee, matches, plug sockets, insecticide, trailing wires, scissors, kettles, knives, bleach or medicines are all everyday household items we barely notice, but may be of far more interest to a child, whose natural curiosity might get the better of them.

Young children watch and learn from adults, wanting to do as they do. Children need supervision when doing so many of the things we take for granted, and a bored, unsupervised child can easily get into exploration which can end up in hospital.

Many safety devices can be bought here in Stanley such as plug socket covers, stairgates and cupboard locks, and others can be ordered from elsewhere. Most of these devices have been developed following serious accidents, to reduce the risk of them happening again.

Little things can make the difference between safety and serious injury, such as moving toys or shoes off the stairs, and never passing hot drinks over the heads of children. Here in the Falklands we see about a dozen children each week in casualty following accidents around the home, and many are preventable.

Some other points: any scald from a hot fluid or object can seriously injure or kill a child; a child can drown in as little as 5cm (2ins) of water, so don't leave them near water unattended; don't leave babies alone with food, a bottle or anything they could choke on, especially small attractive things like coins or grapes (cut grapes in half); babies roll over when you least expect it; any cord around the neck could strangle a child; smoke alarms could save your lives.

WHY is the current state of the MPA road considered acceptable by FIG?

Director of Public Services Department. Manfred Keenleyside, provided a response to this, and the following eight questions.

A I DO not believe that FIG is satisfied with the fact that the MPA Road is mainly unsealed. However, the cost of sealing has been investigated on numerous occasions and has been found to be in excess of what the Islands can currently afford.

There is ongoing work being done on lower cost road surface sealing options than DBM, with some trialling having been done on a sealing process and a larger scale trial planned for next financial year on Moody Brook Road. But this will need to be monitored over time before investment on the scale needed for the MPA road could be recommended even if this trial is successful.

Q IS the Falklands unique in having such a poor quality road between its international airport and capital city?

A I DO not know, but would suggest there can be few if any countries with a length of road to people ratio as high as the Falklands and that the key issue is what can be afforded.

The location of the airport is a factor of its main use - in support of a military base which was sited away from the capital - and the distance is. I would suggest, rather greater than for most capitals - particularly in support of and supported by a population and economy as small as ours.

WHY can't better material be accessed and used to provide a cleaner wearing surface more akin to the MPA to Darwin road?

A THE selection of material for capping is a balance between the quality of the material and the distance it has to be hauled which relates to cost.

All the material used to cap the MPA road in recent years has been Tillite, from several different locations. This is geologically the same rock as was used on the Darwin Road

Public Services Department has identified Tillite as the best material locally available for capping. But this material varies depending on moisture content, plasticity and its degree of weathering along with the particular conditions when the material is placed.

The last lot of capping put on the road to the west of Fitzroy Ridge was from the same borrow pit (Canada Ronde) as the Darwin Road was constructed from.

QIT was reported in Penguin News that the public transport system in camp was suffering

badly due to the scarce resources available to ensure a proper programme of capping and maintenance of highways.

It appears that the use of public resources over a period of around five years to build non-public access roads for the Ministry of Defence to Byron Heights, Mount Alice and the Onion Range has exacerbated this situation.

A THE Penguin News was correct in its reporting as what was said was: "While in the short term there is a shortage of Labour, if the funding were made available operators could be sourced either locally or from overseas."

It is however incorrect to infer that if works done for the Ministry of Defence had not been undertaken that increased levels of capping would have been undertaken, as the level of capping effort has been funding limited.

Q HOW was this situation allowed to happen when it is understood there is a policy of promoting and facilitating the growth of the private sector through FIDC?

A THE private sector has been involved in capping on West Falkland for the past two years with McLee Ltd carrying out work on behalf of PSD.

We are actively working on increasing the amount of work carried out on roads by the private sector which was also reported in the Penguin News.

Q IT is understood FIG operates road construction for the MOD on so called full cost recovery from a basis of partial resource accounting. As a result how can FIG be confident that all costs are recovered such as a finance charge on the cost of capital employed, overheads to cover treasury, legal and other administrative services including consideration by committees and executive council, etc?

A THE road construction is undertaken on the basis of cost recovery

Direct costs are recovered. It appears to have been missed that this is an opportunity to provide support for the defence of the Islands as opposed to simply maximising take from the defence budget.

WHAT is the estimated loss to the economy of FIG carrying out this work since it would be normal practice for the private sector to charge a profit element in addition to proper full cost recovery?

A THIS appears to assume that the works would have been locally contracted to locally based companies and taxed locally.

The first section of Onion Road was constructed by a team of Royal Engineers, as was Mount Kent track, and the first road to Byron Heights was undertaken by a non-local contractor.

It may be that the works would then have attracted less revenue into the Islands' economy rather than more, if not done by FIG.

O AS well as the MOD, are other non-FIG bodies able to procure road construction services from FIG?

A IT is possible to have DBM laid, which has been the case for a number of years, but other than this no

Does FIG intend to expand it's non-public construction service beyond roads?

A There are no plans to do this of which I am aware.

WHEN someone applies for Falkland Islands status or a permanent residence permit who has the final say? Is it one person or a committee?

The answer to this, and the following three questions were provided by Collector of Customs Robert King.

A APPLICATIONS for Falkland Islands status are considered by the elected Legislative Assembly members serving on Executive Council

If Members are minded to refuse an application, the respective applicant will be invited to make further representations within a reasonable time after which a decision whether to approve or refuse the application will then be made.

In the case where an application is refused there is no further right of appeal, however a person whose application has been refused may re-apply at a later time if, for example, they believe that the grounds upon which their application was refused are no longer relevant.

The permanent residence permit points system is intended to be a transparent and non-subjective system which incorporates set criteria applicants must meet in order for their application to be successful. There is also a quota on the number of applications that may be approved in any given permanent residence permit year.

The Principal Immigration Officer is the person who is responsible for ensuring that the set criteria as is relevant to the respective applicant have been met and if he is satisfied a permanent residence permit will be granted to the applicant

Where an application is refused the applicant has the right to appeal to Executive Council and if their appeal is upheld they will be granted a permanent residence permit. A person whose application has been refused and irrespective of whether they have made an appeal which has not been upheld, may re-apply at a later time if, for example, they believe the grounds upon which their application was refused are no longer relevant.

The final say in respect of the granting of Falkland Islands status or of a Permanent Residence Permit therefore rests with the Executive Council.

Q IF it is a committee, who or what constitutes this committee?

A AS detailed above, it is not a committee but it is the Executive Council and the final say in relation to both Falkland Islands status and permanent residence permits rests with the three members of the Legislative Assembly, who have been elected to serve on it by their fellow Legislative Assembly members.

Q DO they take into account any objections from the public?

A THE Executive Council is informed of the details of any objections received from members of the public (if any) in respect of applications made for Falkland Islands status.

In relation to applications for permanent residence permits, objections can only be taken into account by the Principal Immigration Officer, after taking the advice of the Attorney General, if they involve concerns that the character or conduct of an applicant give rise to exceptional and substantial grounds for believing that it would not be in the public interest to approve an application.

Q IF a person is granted status or permanent residency against the wishes of the public, can the councillors overrule their decision?



# SBS hero returns to Falklands

AS a Special Boat Service Sergeant in 1982, Willy Stocks roamed areas of both East and West Falkland and met and fived alongside local residents as he gathered intelligence for the British Forces.

He returned to the Islands this week for the first time in 28 years to pay tribute to fallen comrade, Sergeant Ian "Kiwi" Hunt, the only member of the SBS to die during the war with Argentina.

A plaque in his honour was mounted on a large rock near the spot on Estancia Mountain where he died as a result of what is known as a "blue on blue" incident.

The service, conducted by the Reverend Richard Hines on Wednesday, was attended by a large number of former Royal Marines and Islanders, many of whom had lived in the area at the time and acted as overland drivers and guides to the paratroopers who were pressing towards Stanley.

Maurice Andrews MBE, a former Royal Marine Major attending the plaque dedication ceremony described Sergeant Hunt as "a thinking man's warrior with a wry and wicked sense of humor."

# Oil exploration to continue in Ernest

OIL fortunes ebbed and flowed this week as one exploration company abandoned its well, another looked forward to a second bumper find, and a new player joined the race for black gold in Falklands waters.

Shares in Falkland Gas and Oil fell by more than 60 per cent before recovering slightly to trade 45 per cent lower at 110p on news earlier this week it would plug and abandon its Toroa well, about 90 miles from Stanley in the South Falklands Basin.

FOGL failed to find any hydrocarbons after drilling to almost 2,500 metres, but said it would continue to pursue its other licence areas in the south and east.

Chief Executive Tim Bushell said results were disappointing, but he added: "It has to be remembered that this is the first well in a previously undrilled frontier basin. We look forward to continuing our exploration programme once a suitable deepwater rig has been secured."

The Ocean Guardian rig will now be released to Rockhopper Exploration, seeking a second major find after striking rich at its Sea Lion site. The first significant discovery in the current round of drilling sent Rockhopper shares soaring by 650 per cent in May, and the company hopes to repeat its success at its Ernest prospect in the north, where it will begin drilling later this month.

Meanwhile, a fifth company has announced plans to join the drilling race, once it raises £70 million in a London stock market listing. Argos Resources is led by John Hogan, who worked on Lasmo's attempts to find oil off the Falklands in 1998. The significance of their announcement is that Argos holds licences next to the Rockhopper discovery.

An industry expert was quoted in the UK Guardian as saying: "Punters will be disappointed that

the Toroa well in the South Falklands Basin failed to find reservoired hydrocarbons.

"However, smart investors will be aware of the massive geological and geographical "gap" between the South and North Falklands basins – the latter having been massively derisked by the Sea Lion discovery."

Director of Mineral Resources,

Director of Mineral Resources, Phyl Rendell said her department and the government anticipated the ups and downs of oil exploration, and remained "really pleased" with the programme so far.

"All the difficulties have been overcome and we are particularly pleased to see the first well drilled in the southern basin," she said.

"Technically and logistically it is fantastic. It will take numerous months to analyse but it does represent a landmark in the exploration campaign."

Mrs Rendell said all five existing licensees were now active, and FIG would be seeking interest from other exploration companies later in the year as part of its ongoing marketing strategy.

She also paid special tribute to all those involved in building the lay-down area near FIPASS: "They have done a remarkable job moving all those tonnes of equipment, and there have been no hold-ups to the rig, which has been the main thing."

Argentina, though, continues to express its displeasure. According to La Nacion newspaper, Argos

has already been sent a letter by the Argentine Embassy in London warning it to abstain from drilling or "it will face legal actions."

Similar threats have been levelled at the other exploration companies as the Argentine Government continues its attempts to make life difficult through imposing shipping permits, through its Decree 256, designed to disrupt movement of equipment and supplies between mainland South America and the Falklands.

Lawmakers in Buenos Aires are reported to have now approved a bill to impose sanctions on any companies working in Argentina with links to the Falklands' exploration programme. The bill was passed unanimously in the lower house and is expected to be ratified by the Senate.

Mrs Rendell, though, remained unmoved by the political manoeuvring: "It is not preventing the campaign from proceeding." she said

paign from proceeding," she said.
Acting Governor Ric Nye told the Penguin News yesterday: "As I said in my letter in last week's edition, the UK has protested to Argentina, and has firmly rejected Decree 256.

"The UK Government has made clear its view that it considers that the Decree and its implementing regulations are not compliant with international law, including the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea.

"The Convention provides for ships of all States to enjoy the right of innocent passage through territorial seas. As with other matters concerning a ship's route and operation, it is ultimately for a ship's Master and owners to decide whether or not to comply with the Decree, but there is a clear view in the UK that to do so is unnecessary."

Cllr Emma Edwards, minerals portfolio holder for the Legislative Assembly, was yesterday unavailable for comment.

"THERE'S not enough depth in the newspaper," we were told by a reader this week (before they declined our request for their comment on the country's economic prospects)

It is a common criticism that frustrates journalists worldwide, as much as their readers. When they are levelled at just three journalists who work for one of the world's smallest newspapers, it strikes me as somewhat bizarre. Any individual or organisation can go the extra mile but, in order to achieve extraordinary results, such effort often requires a degree of assistance somewhere down the line.

In the newspaper world, we are not unlike the police. The best information we can gather invariably comes from those most in the know in our own community. Without "informed sources" our hands are often tied. But it is of little use to us if the tips we unearth prove to be unreliable, speculative or agenda-driven. Substantiated facts are our most valuable currency. Anything less may as well go blowin' in the wind.

So how can the Penguin News succeed in occasionally delivering something a little more meaty - while obviously not compromising our other duties to the community? The simple answer is through appealing to everyone (yes, you as well) to help us dig a little deeper

So often we chase leads, pick up news tips, or find a twist in a tale worth developing - only to see the trail dry up because our contacts shrink away, or they are unwilling to offer anything on the

record. Even anonymously.

Some of this malaise is clearly the product of living in a small community, where sticking one's head above the parapet is no more attractive than placing one's neck beneath the guillotine, not exactly a healthy environment in which investigative journalism can expect to thrive. So, for those who bemoan our sometimes fruitless pursuit of such avenues, may I politely suggest they consider lending us their "insider knowledge" once in a while

I write not in anger, because our limited resources oblige us to share those same frustrations. But I should point out that those criticisms to which I refer are levelled at us most often by the very people who can assist us most in meeting those lofty expectations.

I doubt, though, they are among those who, in our last reader survey, rated political news of far less interest than the TV Guide and Give Us Two Minutes. But then that's another opinion piece altogether.

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# Tiphanie lands SSL scholarship

# Open verdict recorded on Jersey Road Flats death

AN OPEN verdict on the death of Stanley man Richard Winston McRae at his home on Jersey Road earlier this year was recorded by Her Majesty's Coroner on Tues-

Mr McRae (66) was found in his flat by a neighbour on April

Coroner John Trevaskis said Mr McRae had a history of alcohol abuse and, although he had suffered seizures and falls, he had declined medical treatment "despite the entreaties of family and friends.

The court heard that there were no signs of forced entry to and his body showed no signs of struggle or violence.

Mr Trevaskis said that due to the delays in discovery of the body, and in securing the attendance of the pathologist, the post mortem examination was hindered by the advancing decomposition of the body. No significant natural disease could be identified which could have caused or contributed to his death.

The inability to carry out toxicological analyses meant it was not possible to establish the cause of death to the required evidential standard.

# Fine, costs and ban for driver

ADRIAN Minnell (40) was fined £1,200, ordered to pay £1,000 costs, £1.684 compensation and disqualified from driving for four years after being found guilty of drink driving in the Senior Magistrate's Court on Friday.

Mr Minnell had pleaded not guilty to the offence, which took place on March 14.

He was found by police seated in the driver's seat of his Land Rover, which had collided with the wall by the Leisure Centre on Reservoir Road, and when breathalysed was found to have a reading of 94mgs/100ml of breath.

Mr Minnell said he had consumed 2 ½ beers, was not driving the vehicle at the time of the incident, and was not over the limit.

Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis said he found the evidence of police officers and the independent witness to be "consistent and credible."

He said Mr Minnell had failed to mention earlier that he wasn't driving, and the evidence provided by the witness for the defence, Mr Minnell's partner Linda Buckland, was "frankly unconvincing."

Mr Trevaskis ruled that the Camic Datamaster machine reading was reliable.

He said. "It appears that the defendant is a regular drinker of alcohol, with a high tolerance, and therefore his outward demeanor and appearance is not as reliable an indicator of his breath/alcohol level as a scientific measurement by a properly calibrated and functioning device."

# **Upgrades** for Camp

CABLE and Wireless is to upgrade elements of the Camp phone network as part of the cutover to the new Softswitch.

Parts of the equipment installed during the Camp Broadband project are not compatible with the new Softswitch and have to be replaced, requiring a visit to every WiMax connected site to replace one piece of equipment.

C&W says this work will also resolve the voice quality issues some customers have experienced on the WiMax network.

All other customers will be moved to new equipment over the next two months.

With regard to FM radio reception in Camp, C&W has told FIG since it built the new Camp network it would be sensible to share infrastructure where possible, given the high costs of installing and maintaining sites in remote locations for small numbers of customers.

# MSL to rake in a healthy £970k

THE Medical Services Levy (MSL), which was approved in the May budget, is to create revenue of £970,000, the Penguin News was told this week.

The levy will be incorporated into the medical department budget and, of this, £310,000 will come from FIG contributions as an employer

Employees are to pay one per cent of their earnings and employers a further 1.5 per cent into the scheme. This will take effect from January 1 and will be operated by the Tax Office.

Financial Secretary Keith Padgett said that of the £970,000 grossed from this initiative, half would be included in the 2010/11 budget for medical, dental and social services for the period January to July 2011.

Mr Padgett said the monies to be collected were, as the title implied, a levy, and as such would not be an automatic entitlement to medical and dental services.

People such as those who are on short-term contracts, and currently pay tax but are not entitled to treatment, would still be required to pay the one per cent levy.

On the other hand, those who would not pay MS1, such as pensioners and children would still be entitled to medical treatment.

The finer details of how the scheme will be operated were still being finalised, Mr Padgett said.

Farmers inquiring as to how they would be required to pay were told last week that the selfemployed would be assessed at the end of the year on their net income when tax returns were made.



South Georgia aims to be free of all rats and mice by 2016

# South Georgia's ambitious bid to rid island of rodents

THE first phase of South Georgia's ambitious plan to rid the island of rodents has been given conditional approval.

Rats and mice have devastated the ecology and seabird populations of South Georgia over two centuries. The Habitat Restoration Project aims to wipe them out by spreading rodent bait pellets by helicopter over the entire land area where they occur.

South Georgia Heritage Trust has tasked Tony Martin as project manager, and his job will be to oversee the operation and ensure strict conditions are met.

The first phase is due to start in February 2011 and aims to eradicate rats from the Thatcher, Mercer and Greene peninsulas. If successful, it should see a dramatic increase in the numbers of ground nesting birds in these areas.

Phase two, to clear the remainder of the island, is expected to be underway in February 2013, and last three years.

Helicopter baiting will take place between mid-February and mid-April each year - after the breeding season of most birds and before the first heavy snowfalls of winter.

# FIG in global PR search

THE Falkland Islands Government is set to beef up its corporate profile as it seeks to employ an international PR company to spruik its image overseas.

The move follows increased international media interest in the Falklands, triggered by recent oil exploration and continued calls from Argentina to hold talks over sovereignty of the Islands. FIG has put out a wide-ranging brief and will be talking to global corporate comms agencies this month.

Sukey Cameron, representative of FIG in the UK, said: "We are looking at our future PR requirements and a decision on the various options will be made by our Legislative Assembly at the end of the month. For political reasons, we do not wish to make any announcement until after that time."

FIG uses Keene Public Affairs for a tourism-based brief and Edelman for general public affairs. Neither is thought to be directly affected.

# Legislative **Assembly Diary**

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

THERE is a chance that FIMCO could become a success story, a rare event in our industrial history. I would recommend reading the 2009/10 review which clearly demonstrates improving results. Of course, the reducing subsidy and increased cash payments to farmers must be balanced against the capital costs of essential improvements, but things seem to be heading in the right direction. I'm happy to have supported it from the outset. even though, as I said at the time, there was no early prospect of profitability.

IF Penguin News readers are not suffering from consultation fatigue after last year's rush of "green papers" it would be useful to receive comment on the **Economic Development Strategy** consultation document. While much of it simply seems to state the obvious, parts are undoubtedly controversial, even among members of the working group, so other views are important.

WE are closer to a conclusion on dealing with the issue of police checks for those working with children and in other sensitive posts. Obviously any properly run organisation will vet candidates for such posts and it is relatively easy, though often time consuming, to do this for all new appointments. The situation is less clear for those who have been in post for many years, with unblemished character, and it does not seem reasonable to go through an expensive exercise for someone who has been considered suitable. I'm confident that the final policy will allow common sense to apply

I AM sad to see that we are losing many good teachers again at the end of this school year. I hope that departure interviews will enable us to take measures to retain more in the future. While I understand future career prospects discourage some from being out of their home systems for too long, I also know that teaching here can be very rewarding. It will be many years before we can fill all posts locally, and even if we do there should be a requirement for sabbaticals to allow people to refresh their skills.

# New Conservation study probes impact of birds of prey on sheep

OVER the next five months Falklands Conservation, in conjunction with the Department of Agriculture, the Environmental Planning Department and local farmers, will be conducting a pilot study into the conflict between birds of prey and sheep farming.

Sam Cockwell has recently returned to the Islands to take on the role of Project Officer for the

The bird species under scrutiny are the Turkey Vulture, Striated Caracara. Crested Caracara and the Southern Giant Petrel which, while technically not a raptor, has been known to interact with livestock in some parts of the Falklands.

These four bird species, being both predators and scavengers, account for an unknown number of livestock deaths each year. The

first objective of the project is to determine the locations and severity of the conflicts, through discussions with landowners and field trials. Methods for capture, marking and tracking the birds also will be tested to identify which are the most successful and least stressful for the hirds

This Darwin Initiative funded project brings together scientific data and the insights of farmers, and is designed to enable Falklands Conservation to determine best practice and implementation for a longer term project, that will develop recommendations for reducing these conflicts for the benefit of farmers, their livestock and Falkland wildlife

Mr Cockwell said he was grateful to those people who had already offered him feedback on the project during Farmers

# Red tape risks future of sea truck operations

DESPITE vast sums being invested in repairs to sea trucks for the outer islands, which have no alternative for landing supplies, their future appears bleak

The ageing sea trucks, which have served coastal shipping so well over the past 15-20 years, have been severely restricted in their use and have cost about £100,000 to ensure their operation

But Councillor Roger Edwards considers these restrictions "ri-

The sea truck currently being used to service the outer islands was repaired locally and accepted by the Maritime Coastal Agency as adequate to allow the issue of a load-line exemption which specifies conditions under which it has to operate.

The most important of these, and one that is causing concern for both Workboat Services and their customers, is that it is limited to carrying the weights "for which the craft is designed to carry.

The manual states that this is a maximum cargo of 1,650 kilos in good sea conditions, and eliminates vehicles such as even a Land Rover 90, which had traditionally been safely landed onto beaches for

many years.
WSL manager Adam Cockwell is sympathetic to the problems this creates: "We all know that in the past this weight has been safely

exceeded, but now we have been explicitly told there is a limit, it can't be ignored and that is the bottom line," he said

Some islands have had the resources to build ramps suitable for the Concordia Bay to use the bow door on, and there are others that could do the same. However, some islands will always require a sea truck landing, said Mr Cockwell.

"Look at Bleaker Island," said Cllr Edwards. "Most of that ramp was built by a man with a wheelbarrow.

The second sea truck had the hull repaired by UK contractors at the request of the government, a task which has been suggested cost more than £100,000.

Mr Cockwell said the engine needed to be replaced when time allowed, but it would still be subject to similar restrictions.

He said it was his understanding that the government was actively pursuing getting the crafts certificated by the MCA to carry cargo in excess of the specified 1,650 kilos. The craft would then need to be proven as capable, and there was a risk such trials could make matters worse.

Cllr Edwards told the Penguin News: "I believe that rules and regulations will sink these islands. The more that are brought in the more it will cost us. The limitations in place are ridiculous. It makes you wonder if we ought to operate under a different flag.

Cllr Edwards said had Executive Council been properly briefed when recommendations were put before them in May, the money might well have been used to buy a sea truck able to carry more.

The extra materials used to bring the sea trucks up to the desired "as new or better" standard required, had in fact increased the weight of the vessel and reduced the payload, said Cllr Edwards.

Now there is no money to buy a new one and even a short wheel based Land Rover can't be shifted

from ship to shore.

Mr Cockwell said: "It's as frustrating for us as it is for everyone else, but unfortunately the regulations are what they are and we can't chose when we want the British flag and when we don't, he said.

When the MCA next visits, MLAs intend to meet with them and discuss some of the rules and regulations in place.

# EDS says partnership is the key to success

THE Falkland Islands requires an enhanced foreign investment climate, among many other economic "enablers." in order to achieve a sustainable economic future, according to the newly released Falkland Islands Economic Development Strategy (EDS)

The document, released for public consultation last Thursday after two years in the making, examines countless themes that affect the Islands' economy.

Under "business environment issues" it notes that while the Islands offer a relatively open economy, an improved tax regime, legal framework and foreign investment climate will facilitate the attraction of more developmentfriendly capital.

The economic landscape of the Falklands has transformed substantially over the past 25 years, and the past decade has been marked by modest economic growth. However, "several strategic shortcomings exist," notes the document.

It says the economy is overly dependent on three vulnerable sectors: fishing, agriculture and tour-

In addition, internally, geographic isolation, a small and ageing population, a looming labour gap and skills shortage limit the Islands' ability to continue to build upon its "strong legacy of the past and to develop a sustainable and vibrant economy for the future.

According to the EDS the retention of highly skilled and educated workers on temporary work permits remains low and the labour force remains static in terms of "size, upskilling and new op-

The document emphasises that the current immigration and work permit policy needs to more efficiently induce a growth in permanent residency and reduce the high outbound turnover rate and high cost of worker recruitment.

The paper also notes the "attitude of Argentina poses challenges for the Falkland Islands," and any economic development strategy will have to take into account the political, diplomatic and commercial ramifications of Argentine actions and foreign policy.

In terms of the business environment, in the short term there will be moves to forge cooperative working relations and partnership between the government and the private and non-profit sectors. A Board of Investments (one-stop investment promotion agency) will also be introduced.

In the longer term there will be fiscal incentives to stimulate development and a favorable and development-friendly tax policy.

Regarding the legal environment, the regulatory regime can be used to "improve the competitive environment," entailing a faster response and delivery in the creation and amendment of legislation to improve business efficiency, optimise business opportunities and instill confidence in the regime.

Under medium term actions for trade policy the document suggests a "Special Economic Zone" in Stanley and at Fox Bay (or possibly Fitzroy on East Falklands) to attract foreign investments and enterprises, including agri-businesses, tourism and port related enterprises

The worrying issue of labour supply may be solved by streamlining and fast-tracking a flexible work permit programme driven by market needs, as well as extending automatic residence or permanent right to remain to aliens currently in the Islands and returning former Falklands residents.

Immigration reform and legislative changes will cover the establishment of a clear path towards permanent residence and Falkland Islands status, with a shorter qualifying period.

The specific targets of the document are numerous but, according to the introduction, overall the aim of the project is for "the public, private and voluntary sector to work together on ensuring the Islands continue to thrive.

# Ideas urged to flow from tourism think tank

ACCOMMODATION providers and tour operators have been urged to think big and not to give up on ideas too soon, during meetings held with the Tourist Board last week.

Tourist Board director and travel consultant Sally Ellis said it was important to believe in a product and, if it didn't take off in the first year, to persevere.

She said it could take more than a year for a new product to be taken up by visitors, many of whom would also book up to a year in advance.

"Build and defend a desirable image." said Mrs Ellis, of International Tours and Travel, encouraging operators to think beyond the local market and consider the international market if they really wanted to grow.

Raising the sometimes thorny issue of commission, she said ten per cent was considered acceptable and recom-

mended operators build it into their price and set their price structure a year in advance.

She said it was difficult for agents to sell a product if they were not able to make anything

off it themselves, and they would not be willing to spend on advertising if they didn't.

"Make every day memorable for a visitor," she advised, adding: "A positive customer experience is not a luxury, but a necessity."

A positive experience could result in nine more customers through word of mouth, and it cost at least six times more to attract the next customer than retain an old one, was the thrust of Sally's message.

A workshop was held on Friday when operators and interested parties bandied ideas about and worked on possible itineraries that would share resources in local areas.

"Ideas need to be captured and there is a lot more to be gained from sharing than keeping ideas to yourself," Tourist Board manager Paul Trowell told the group.

He urged Tourist Board members as well as non members to call into the office at the Jetty Centre and to discuss new ideas.

"We've got an open door policy and we want to help where we can," he said.

IF I was not a Falkland Islander, I would be a Uruguayan. Which is why I watched avidly as "El Celeste" (should that be "La"?) fought its way through to the semifinals in South Africa, putting up a fight out of all proportion to its size.

"I know you!." I said (and instantly thought. 'I bet he gets that every day'). "How are you?" "Getting there," he replied. I

"Getting there," he replied. I noticed the scar that ran from below his hairline and disappeared under his beret. This man had won Britain's highest award for bravery, specifically for saving his colleagues – repeatedly – during ambushes. Ian McKay and H Jones, who won their VCs in the Falklands, were of the same calibre.

Corporal Beharry told me that he was collecting a pair of boots. He rather proudly showed them to me. The toecaps were mirrorlike gloss black. He would, he said, be wearing them the next day to meet the Prime Minister.

I thought (but did not say) that this was pleasantly ironic, considering the title of his autobiography is "Barefoot Soldier."

A few minutes later I saw him zooming off down the road in a very posh Lexus car. I guessed that his fame and his book had brought him some extra cash, which is only right.

He is, undoubtedly, a hero. And I was so pleased to meet him. But he reminded me that I do not know entirely what to make of the chorus of people and organisations who demand that we celebrate all our combatants as heroes. They are certainly made of fine stuff, but something bothers me about the heroes refrain.

I think it may be that there I detect an element of public guilt. The men, and occasionally women.

who die on operations are overwhelmingly (although not exclusively) young, working class ordinary soldiers or non-commissioned officers. Many have few educational qualifications and they see the Army (rightly, because it does offer good opportunities) as a way to escape the drudgery of no-hope jobs and/or grim council estates. I fear that we have shortchanged them. Not only do we offer them little hope of social progression, but we also expect them to fight our wars and even die for us. Perhaps instead of saying thanks to soldiers, sailors and airmen, we should be saying sorry

The wealthier parts of the UK send very few of its sons and daughters to the Forces, mainly because they can choose to do safer, easier and better paying work.

work..

I never thought I would say it, but I think compulsory military service – as still exists in some EU and Nato countries – would be a good thing. If we had the draft, all young people would be called up, and when the country goes to war the terrible price in lives would be spread fairly across society.

I think too that we would not go to war so often. If more parliamentarians, peers, newspaper proprietors, judges and bishops had sons or daughter in the armed forces, rather more time might be spent seeking peaceful solutions to international problems.

# PRINCIPAL COMPLAINTS COMMISSIONER

Applications are sought for the post of Principal Complaints Commissioner.

Chapter IX of the new Constitution provided for the appointment of Complaints Commissioners from time to time to investigate complaints of maladministration in government and any other matters prescribed by Ordinance. The Complaints Commissioners Ordinance 2010 prescribed the functions, powers and jurisdiction of Complaints Commissioners and also provided for the appointment of a Principal Complaints Commissioner.

The appointment of a Principal Complaints Commissioner will be a major step in ensuring the good governance of the Falkland Islands. It will provide a further avenue of complaint once existing avenues have been exhausted, will allow an independent check to ensure that complaints have been handled properly and fairly, and will provide for a greater degree of transparency in the complaints process, where appropriate.

Complaints Commissioners will be entitled to a daily attendance allowance when engaged on their functions. No-one can be appointed as a Complaints Commissioner if they are a member of the public service or the Legislative Assembly.

Those wishing to apply for the post of Principal Complaints Commissioner should write to the Governor at Government House by Friday 23 July with their name, address and contact details, the nature of their current employment, and a brief explanation of their reasons for applying and the skills that they would bring to the post.

# Hot shots on fire at Bisley

The Falkland Islands Defence Force team has done the Islands proud again at Bisley in the UK. returning with a host of medals after an arduous training and competition period over two weeks.

From June 24 to July 8 the team of eight FIDF shooters trained on the Pirbright and Bisley ranges, and participated in the HM Forces Central Skill at Arms Meeting (CENTSAM).






The Lady Elizabeth's resting place since 1936 Picture: D Roberts

# Iron lady fighting a losing battle with corrosion

IT is interesting to read the recent surge of concern for the Lady Elizabeth being expressed both on facebook and in the Penguin News, and good to see the fragile nature of our heritage being acknowledged.

The Board of Trustees of the Museum and National Trust feel that it is appropriate that we make our position clear at this stage.

This is not to discourage any attempt to preserve the Lady Elizabeth but an attempt to give a realistic examination of the prospects for this beautiful landmark.

The problem

THE main problem for the Lady Elizabeth is rust. She is an iron ship and, as such, the battle with corrosion began the day she was constructed.

But that was not a problem at the time – these ships were never meant to last forever, they were functional objects with a life expectancy of maybe 30 or 40 years.

The salt from seawater makes corrosion even worse, which is why the area of the ship below the waterline is in the worst state – although, as we have all seen, the entire body of the Lady Elizabeth is battered on a rough day.

Built in 1879, the ship has spent 131 years in the sea – almost 100 of these in Stanley and 74 in Whalebone Cove – without any maintenance or protection from the elements.

The Great Britain was in the Islands for 84 years after being condemned and abandoned at Sparrow Cove before being recovered and returned to Bristol in 1970.

Restoration

I AM in no way an expert, but in my time at the Museum I have met with many who are - professionals from maritime museums all over the world.

Whenever I raised the issue of our hulks, their responses were the same—they all advised extreme caution and many immediately urged that no further thought should be given to attempting any preservation.

Many museums have learned the hard way that the initial campaign to save a ship is only the beginning. Once begun, the preservation of ships is never, ever finished.

It requires an enormous commitment – not only in terms of finances, but also in materials and skilled mannower. However, inevitably it all comes down to money, and the numbers involved in any restoration venture are simply terrifying.

For example, as part of the restoration project, the SS Great Britain has already been given more than £11 million of lottery money (for which we do not qualify, unfortunately), and operating costs run into several million pounds every year.

The Cutty Sark project, initially estimated at £35 million in 2008, has been revised to £46 million with rumours that still more will be required.

That is not to say that it is impossible – it is probably not – but clearly massive private funding would be required, along with the establishment of a permanent organisation with specialised, highly skilled staff to carry out the work and then to continue trying to hold back time ad infinitum.

Condition survey

THE Museum and National Trust has monitored the condition of the Lady Liz along with the other Stanley hulks, but has not been in a position to do anything other than record the inevitable decay. We last had the hulk surveyed in 2006. The

report showed that what remained was is in very poor condition.

The wooden decking is rotten and disintegrating, the bulwarks around the whole ship are solid rust and can be broken by hand, there are large cracks in the hull and "the iron plates which make up the outer hull are rusted to a point where there appears to be very little iron left."

The condition of the bowsprit was found to be extremely poor and it was expected that this could fail at any time – an opinion that was validated the following winter when it was broken in a gale.

On a positive note, it was found that although the deck beams and mast supports were thick with rust up to one inch thick, when this was knocked away there was some solid metal beneath.

These beams are closely spaced with strengthening diagonals running throughout the ship, so some structural rigidity does remain within the hull, but this could fail because of the poor state of the iron hull plating.

The hull below the waterline was not surveyed, but it was noted that it had been breeched in several places allowing sand, sediment and sea life to cover the lower parts of the ship, and that it was "quite easy to knock a small hole through the side of the hull at almost any point."

Surprisingly, the spar that hangs so precariously over the deck was found to be "very well secured, and is possibly the most secure part of the ship." However, it should be noted that this was four years ago and there is no guarantee that this is still the case.

What is certain is that the Lady Elizabeth is a hazardous structure with many unseen dangers – it absolutely should not be boarded. In fact, it is illegal to do so without the express authority of the Receiver of Wreck.

Conclusion

ALL this sounds terribly gloomy and negative, and probably gives the impression that the M&NT does not want to see anything done with the Lady Elizabeth.

This is absolutely not the case — we would love to see the hulk restored and established as the show-piece of a centre celebrating the Falklands' rich maritime heritage.

We hoped that something on a much smaller scale could be done for the Jhelum, but the support was not there at the time.

What we have been able to save of the Charles Cooper cannot be displayed and appreciated because of lack of space, so perhaps we are a little jaded, our zest and optimism slightly worn down by the reality of limited funds and an ever-increasing list of objects and sites that we would like to save for future generations, but may not be able to.

The M&NT would not wish to discourage any efforts to save the hulk – far from it, if someone is able to find a way, there will be no organisation more delighted.

What must be avoided is a tragedy like that of the Fennia – towed away with the best of intentions and lost because enthusiasm blinded the reality that there was not enough money available.

We will gladly make available the condition survey, photographs, etc that are held at the Museum and will do whatever we can to help anyone who is able to find funds to explore the feasibility of any restoration.

However, it is not too difficult to see that any such project with the Lady Elizabeth is well beyond the resources of the M&NT.

## The Lady Elizabeth: fact file

Launched on June 4 1879 in Sunderland Iron barque of 1208 gross tons, 1155 net tons Length: 223ft Breadth: 35ft

Purchased by London shipowner John Wilson shortly after her launch, and registered at the port of London on August 21, the ship operated as the largest of Wilson's fleet of eight or nine ships. The ship's first voyage took her from North Shields to Bombay.

In 1884 the Lady Elizabeth was purchased by George Karran of the Isle of Man, who sailed the ship as master for the next seven years and owned her for many more.


For the majority of her career, the ship ran mainly in the liner trade, carrying general cargo between Britain and Australia, and then tramping to North and South America, Australia and various ports in the Far East.



In 1906 the Lady Elizabeth was sold to a Norwegian company. She set out on her last voyage in December 1912, sailing from Vancouver to Delagoa Bay in Mozambique with a cargo of lumber. She arrived in distress at Stanley on March 14 1913. She had encountered bad weather and lost four men overboard, along with two boats and part of the deck cargo.

On the way into Stanley, the Lady Elizabeth hit the Uranie Rock off Volunteer Point, sustaining a 6ft break in her keel and a foot-long hole in her bottom. She was condemned in June and purchased for use as a storage hulk.

The Lady Elizabeth served as a floating warehouse in Stanley Harbour until, on February 17 1936, she broke from her mooring in a particularly fierce gale and drifted down the harbour to Whalebone Cove where she ran aground and still rests today.



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The Falklands Health Promotion Group continues its series of columns aimed at making our lives longer, safer and healthier. This week the focus is on keeping your child safe outdoors...

CHILD safety outside the home might include your garden, garage, workplace, anywhere children might play (especially near water) and possibly most importantly "out and about." where traffic is the greatest concern for many parents.

As children develop they are desperate to gain independence. Here in the Falklands, in our relatively safe environment it's easy to forget that many of the risks we see elsewhere still apply here, and winter time can add to these

Poor visibility, ice and more hours of darkness make roads more dangerous for children.

Parents and carers need to teach their children to cross roads safely, and lead by example, while drivers need to take care and watch their speed.

Children are unpredictable. and easily distracted. As sixyear-olds can get focused on a ball, teenagers are just as likely to be unaware of traffic when texting or chatting to friends.

Other points to consider: \* Children need to learn to cycle safely (RFIP offers cycling proficiency training for IJS aged children - contact Rob Bryson on 281001

\* Cycle helmets can reduce the risk of head injury by 85%

\* Children who are passengers in a vehicle need a size appropriate child restraint until they are 150cms (available in many Stanley shops). Child seats need to be fitted safely and checked

\* Airbags can be dangerous for children - follow the guidelines

\* Drivers, take care around parked vehicles

\* Children under nine can't judge speed and distance accurately Garages and workshops are full of hazards: tools, firearms,

weedkiller, petrol, trophies from 1982, etc. which can all hold a fascination to kids of all ages

Potential accident blackspots for children around Stanley are near schools, play parks, sweet shops, car parks, the Shack, the Leisure Centre and anywhere children congregate. The Child Accident Prevention Trust has more information online

HOW frequently has an Orthopaedic Surgeon visited the Falklands since January 2007, and on what dates? Chief Medical Officer Mandy Heathman responds to this, and the following four questions.

A THE orthopaedic surgeon has visited each year since 2007. Visiting consultants come here in their leave times so we are limited by their availability and willingness to give up their leave time. We are very grateful to them for their visits and the support that they give us while here and in between visits.

ON each occasion, how long has the surgeon stayed in the Islands?

A In 2007 they were here from January 15-26, nine working days; in 2008 from February 25-29, five working days; in 2009 from June 5-11, six working days; and in 2010 from March 29 to April 9, six working days.

ON average, how many patients does the surgeon see

while on the Islands, and how many procedures are carried out during his/her visit?

A ON average they have 94 appointments filled and carry out on average 10 procedures.

HOW many patients are seen by the Orthopaedic Surgeon and subsequently referred to the UK for treat-

A ON average 94 appointments are filled and between 6-16 people are referred overseas to the UK.

OVER the last three years, how many patients have undergone orthopaedic procedures in the UK and Chile?

A SINCE 2007 we have sent 41 patients as a result of the orthopaedic visit for planned procedures - 14 to Chile and the rest to the UK.

The patients sent to Chile are usually for investigation pur-poses such as an MRI or CT scan. Following this they may be reviewed during the next orthopaedic visit or may be referred to the UK for surgery.

When patients are referred to the UK for orthopaedic surgery they may go to the hospital where the visiting specialist comes from, or they may be referred to other hospitals if that is more appropriate, either medically or socially.

We have no control over the length of the waiting lists in the UK although we do our very best to expedite appointments if we

can do.

The orthopaedic surgeons from Inverness provide an outstanding service for us and try and arrange appointments for Falkland patients to suit their travel needs, etc.

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

# After years of decline, St Helena strikes gold

ST HELENA Governor Andrew Gurr could hardly contain his excitement over yesterday's announcement that the island's long hoped for airport has at last been given the go-ahead.

"I saw a wonderful rainbow as I came down through Half Tree Hollow this morning," he said.

Hollow this morning," he said.
"Although it has religious significance, mythically it has a pot of gold at the end.

"Well, our airport is no longer just a myth, and now we have the very real prospect of grasping that pot of gold – self sustainability within our own lifetimes."

The announcement by the UK Government not only ends decades of frustration for St Helenians – the airport bid was first mooted in the 1960s – but it also heralds unprecedented change. Mr Gurr said islanders could now look forward to a burgeoning economy, major investment and tremendous opportunities for local industry, employment and tourism.

Tourist visitors alone are expected to leap from fewer than 1,000 a year to more than 29,000 after the airport is built.

More than 400 St Helenians live in the Falklands. Their Government Representative, John Clifford, yesterday told the Penguin News: "It's very early days yet and there is a long way to go, but it is very positive for St Helena. I think there is great potential in this for both St Helena and the Falklands."

# Business defiant in face of decree

FALKLANDS business leaders are defying Argentine attempts to disrupt the Islands economy by strengthening supply links with the UK.

And even though business with Chile is under pressure because of shipping restrictions imposed under the Argentine Government's Decree 256, one businessman said meeting the current challenges could lead to a stronger local economy in the long-term.

Decree 256 requires ships entering or exiting the Falklands to obtain authorisation from Argentina. However, Chamber of Commerce President Roger Spink said he believed it would impact more on suppliers of goods and services in Chile than the Falklands.

He said many Falkland businesses had already taken steps to obtain alternative sources of supply from the UK: "This is regretable because good and long standing trading relationships have built up and matured since 1982.

"Many Magallanes businesses are cutting back after losing trade with the Falklands due to the decree, and they and their employees must feel penalised by their neighbours."

Mr Spink said it was the view of the Chamber Council that Argentine attempts to disrupt the economy of the Falklands were part of an orchestrated campaign to achieve by so-called peaceful means what they failed to achieve by military means in 1982.

"This aggressive bullying of 3,000 people by a nation of 40 million shows the Argentine Republic has no respect whatsoever for the human rights of the Falkland Islanders or the people of Punta Arenas while, at the same time, Argentina cynically promotes its commitment to human rights on the world stage," said Mr Spink.

The Chamber was very disappointed not to have seen a higher level of support for the Falklands from the world in response to what is in effect a sea-blockade of the EEC citizen population here, he added.

Although some local retailers had concerns about supply and possible price increases, businessman Hamish Wylie said he felt a "lack of cottage cheese and cheap eggs" was a small price to pay for resisting Argentine aggression.

"Despite an increase in the cost of some items resulting from the Argentine blockade, I would not want to swap our economy and standard of living for theirs," he told the Penguin News. "Business folk generally relish a challenge, but also seek to reduce risk. I imagine the current challenges can

only strengthen the Islands' economy in the longer term. We have probably become overly reliant on our links with South America in some areas."

Acting Governor Ric Nye maintained the UK position had been clear and robust throughout: "The UK Government considers that Argentine Decree 256 does not comply with international law, has thus formally rejected the decree, and continues to protest and lobby on this point," he said. "The UK has issued advice to shipping accordingly, saying that the view of the UK Government is that there is no need to comply with the decree."

Assembly Member Roger Edwards said the Chamber's views had summed the situation up well: "Decree 256 is illegal and does not comply with the United Nation's Convention on Laws of the Sea (UNCLOS)," he said. "It's a great shame Argentina are doing what they are, because it won't change our stance on sovereignty. They won't beat us into submission."

He agreed with Mr Spink that Argentina was serving only to alienate the younger population, not those affected by the 1982 war who already had strong views. "The young people are really starting to question Argentina's actions," he said.

# First-time buyers snap up plots

THE Mink Park building plots have been allocated in record quick time with the 19 plots available attracting 25 tenders of which 23 were first time buyers.

Of the 19 plots allocated, 18 were to first-time buyers and nine were allocated their first choice plot. All were allocated on a highest bid basis.

As a matter of policy, FIG does not release names of successful tenderers and the amounts they bid until the leases have been signed.

Tenders closed on Monday at 4.30pm and by 8am on Thursday morning excited first time builders were collecting their letters to find out whether their bid had been successful or not.

The plots were available to first time buyers; people who do not own a house or have previously benefitted from subsidised plots and those who have status or Permanent Residence Permits.

Assembly Member Jan Cheek said although the plots had been oversubscribed it was not drastically so and it had given a good indication of what is further required.

She said they were now looking at proposals to develop the West end of Stanley further and discuss other identified sites.

# Shear joy for Golden boys

Molkenbuhr's dream came true this week when he found himself stepping up to take part in the team shear final at the World Championship in Wales on Wednesday

I had the biggest smile ever on my face. I'd been daydreaming about getting up on that stage since Christmas and then there I was. Lee told Penguin News soon after he had put down his hand piece and wiped the sweat from his brow

Lee and fellow shearer Jan Clarke took part in both the individual and team shear at the Golden Shears World Championship and took respectable places in both events against world class shearers from 28 countries

The team shear was Lee and Jan's strength where they finished in sixth position, and earned the honour of having the cleanest pens of sheep on the scoreboard. Speed had been the issue, said Lee, with the winning New Zealand team taking just 12:15 minutes to shear the 20 sheep and the Falklands team taking 15:05 minutes. Penalties are incurred based on the fastest team's time.

After working their way through two rounds and a semifinal in the individual shear, Jan and Lee finished 11th and 12th respectively out of 51 shearers. The top six shearers took part in the final which was won by New ZeaDavid Fagan (second).

But the team shear was the best result for Falklands shearers to date on cross breeds. Strong woolled lambs from Welsh breeds were used throughout the competitions and some of the international shearers were reported to find them a bit wriggly.

Even former champion shearer of Wales Nicky Beynon had to retrieve an escapee to huge applause

from the audience.

"Just to see the Falklands up there on the stage was amazing, said full-time shearer Lee.

But while he makes a living from shearing, he says it is also a sport: "To me it's a sport, especially at that level. It's all about fitness, technique and achieving a

Also at the Golden Shears was rookie shearer Stefen Clarke. With just two seasons under his belt Stefen entered the World Championship Seniors event and finished in 11th place out of 78 shearers.

He has done really well and qualified for the semi finals in three events," said Lee.

The three shearers are off to the Corwen Show in Wales tomorrow (Saturday) for a relay shear.

Lee is hoping the Falklands will take a wool handling team to New Zealand next year. "We've got some very good wool handlers in the Falklands and I'd really like to get a team together," he said.

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# A detour to Dakar for airbridge passengers

AIRBRIDGE passengers this week spoke of their experience after their plane was diverted to Senegal following engine problems.

The aircraft was on the ground for three days in Dakar, where civilian aircraft operators were responsible for accommodating passengers and crew while they waited for specialist parts to arrive to fix the problem.

Andrew Newman, a passenger on the aircraft, said he hadn't realised an engine had stopped functioning, because he was asleep at the time, although he woke up when the captain announced they were to be diverted.

He said they told the passengers that the port engine had flared out, and attempts to restart it had failed, which necessitated landing in Dakar. An engine flaring out simply means the igniters no longer work, so there was nothing to ignite the fuel, Andrew said.

"From a passenger point of view they were pretty honest, and they did their best to look after us," he said. "It was a bit of an adventure in one sense. We had these rickety old taxis, with the

bags strapped to the roof." Another passenger, Bernice Hewitt, didn't realise there was a problem with the aircraft engine until much later: "I didn't know we were landing in Dakar because I didn't hear the announcement as I was sleeping. I had to ask other people where we were, and why we were there.

"I just thought it was a small technical fault. Someone told me later that day the engine had stopped working, and I was glad I hadn't heard the announcement, it was scary."

Bernice said she liked the hotel resort the passengers stayed in, although she admitted to getting frustrated: "You get really excited about coming home, and then it takes four days. It was disappointing," she said. Lucas Biggs was sitting close

Lucas Biggs was sitting close to the engine and heard the fault developing: "All of a sudden the engines went really, really loud, like they were revving up," he said.

"I noticed mainly because I couldn't hear through my head-phones anymore. The engine went really loud, then really quiet.

"It just cut out. I was a bit nervous, but not too much, as I know that planes can fly with one engine just fine," he said.

Jack Russell, Chief of Staff at MPA, said the airbridge schedule should have returned to normal today at the earliest.

"Of course, this level of disruption is regrettable and a source of frustration to us all," he said.

"But it should be remembered that the role of the South Atlantic Airbridge is to support the military operation in the South Atlantic, it is not a commercial service. As such our priorities are different; military operational priorities and the safety of passengers will override all other considerations."

# Penguin deaths AN estimated 500 dead penguins

have washed up on the shores of Brazil in the Sao Paula state, apparently having starved to death. Sarah Crofts of Falklands Conservation said this was similar to what happened in 2008, when hundreds of magellanies were washed up on the shores of Brazil. The cause of them starving is not known, she said, although it could be due to anomalies in currents and temperatures. Falklands magellanies do migrate to the coast of South America, although it is unknown if they migrate that far north, she added.

#### Vehicle fire

THE RAF Firefighter Section at MPA attended a vehicle fire on the MPA road just before 11am on Wednesday. The vehicle was a large eight-wheel dump truck filled with gravel from the quarry. The smoke was visible from 14 miles away, and the rear end of the truck was ablaze with flames close to the vehicle's fuel tank. The crew continued cooling the vehicle after the fire was extinguished, as reignition was a threat.

FORMER FIGAS technician Chris Bramley passed away in the UK a week ago. #### Islanders abroad

FALKLAND Islanders living overseas are once again able to buy and inherit property in the Islands. Following a meeting of the Lands Committee, Assembly Member Sharon Halford said the moratorium on the grant of licences for the purchase of houses in Stanley for persons with FI Status resident overseas had been lifted.

#### Second spud

ROCKHOPPER Exploration is preparing to spud its second well in the North Falklands basin. On Wednesday morning they were reassigned operation of the Ocean Guardian, which is currently being moved to the Ernest prospect, with operations expected to take approximately 30 days.

# Smiles on their dials as the church clock goes about face

GOOD progress is being made with the project to repair and refurbish the 96-year-old clock of Christ Church Cathedral.

The clock's four dials were removed from the church tower in February, on advice from Steve Coombes of UK clock specialists Gillett and Johnston.

Since then, Rob Yssel has completed a commission from the Cathedral Council to refurbish all four solid copper dials.

The clock faces have been cleaned down to bare metal, primed and repainted, and all the dials' roman-style numerals have been freshly gilded.

Rob has skillfully applied wafer thin sheets of 24 carat gold, which should ensure the numerals, together with the clock's four sets of hands, are clearly visible from all over Stanley for many years to come.

A date has not been set for their restoration, but the Rev Hines said: "It should not be long before the bright gleaming dials are replaced."

Meanwhile, an order has been placed by the Cathedral Council for a Tempora quartz master clock, which includes its own inbuilt GPS radio receiver.

The new high-tech master clock will be installed alongside the former clock, and will transmit a

signal pulse to a drive unit, which in turn will make use of the original clock's dial motion work to advance the hands on each of the four dials in one minute steps.

The new master clock comes supplied with a battery back-up and, in the event of a mains electricity failure, the clock's hands will remain stationary until power is restored, when the master clock will then automatically drive the hands to the correct time.

In addition to the new clock, an hour-strike mechanism is to be installed which uses a single electronic bell hammer to strike the Cathedral's large tenor bell. The bell will be easily silenced during the hours of darkness.

The former clock mechanism, manufactured by JW Benson of London in 1904, together with its winding gear and weights, all of which is now made safe, is to be carefully preserved. Each piece, as far as possible, will be kept in its original position in the top of the tower.

Since the visit of Mr Coombes, all work on the clock has been undertaken by a small team of locally-based and skilful people—including FIDF's Major Peter Biggs who, from a suspended harness, guided the safe removal of the dials using a series of ropes and pulleys.

When the new electronic clock arrives, to be shipped down with the generous help of Stanley Services Ltd, it will be installed by the same local team, which also includes Cathedral Warden Howard Turner and Council member Chris

Reverend Richard Hines said: "It will be an exciting and happy new era for the Falkland Islands when Stanley's residents and visitors alike can prick up their ears and lift up their heads on hearing the Cathedral clock strike the hour - then check to ensure their watches are correct!"

### Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

THE recent questionnaire on employment law was devised by the Policy Department in response to a request by MLAs to look at particular issues. A minimum wage is a mark of a developed economy and ensures that the lower paid are not exploited unfairly to boost husiness profits. During the election campaign and since, we have been made aware of a loophole being used to deprive some employees of sick pay and holiday rights by treating them as part-time or temporary employees, even though their working hours are considerably higher than an average working week. I'm hoping that the consultation via the questionnaire will not delay action on these problems and fighting the suspicion that this may be a cynical delaying tactic.

THE excellent performance of the FIDF in recent competitions confirms again that shooting is something in which we can truly compete internationally. That is in no way a criticism of other sporting enterprises. It is great that our sports people can experience international competition, even when they do end up as gallant losers; everyone loves to cheer on the underdog.

WITH appointment to the Complaints Commissioner post now in view it becomes increasingly important that individuals exhaust other avenues of complaint first. There are clear procedures for complaints, and only if they do not satisfy the complainant's reasonable expectations should the complaint go further. Assembly members are generally happy to take up complaints, but they and ultimately the Complaints Commissioner should be last, not first resort. Unfortunately we are often presented with hearsay dressed up as fact; in some instances an unfortunate MLA takes up a cause only to find that their informant has embroidered the facts which are then indignantly and correctly refuted.

IT is interesting to note that the non-appointment of an Argentine ambassador to London suddenly becomes newsworthy, in spite of the long period that has elapsed since they last had one in post. If it is intended as a protest it has been a long time Jan Cheek MLA

# Enemy forces repelled in huge joint exercise

WHILE most people in the Falklands were making their way through the working week, the combined forces of the military, the Falkland Islands Defence Force and police were repelling enemy attacks on land and at sea.

Exercise Purple Strike ran from Monday to Friday, testing the nerve and the capabilities of the joint forces as they fought "aggressors" around Port Howard on the West, Onion Range on the East, Hadassa Bay near Stanley, and an all-out assault on MPA.

First into action was Number 3 Company of the Welsh Guards, supported by the Light Dragoons and the FIDF. They were sent to the West on HMS Clyde, while Sea King helicopters provided infra-red footage of the "enemy" using thermal imaging cameras.

A four-hour attack was launched by the mortar platoon on Wednesday and, after a successful outcome, the soldiers marched seven kilometres back to the Clyde before returning to East Cove.

Aircraft support continued to scour the skies, and the soldiers were soon redeployed by Sea King and Brintel helicopters for the next stage of the exercise at Onion Range, digging in through a cold night while reconnaisance patrols located their targets.

Meanwhile the operation took another turn as all 1,800 soldiers, sailors, airmen and civilians – including contractors – based at MPA countered a scenario which included vehicle ambushes and bomb threats.

At the same time, HMS Portland, stationed far out to sea, was dealing with a would-be submarine attack.

Chief of Police Gary Finchett mobilised his emergency planning team when he was tasked to follow-up a report of armed men at Hadassa Bay. Supported by MPA and FIDF Silver Command liaison officers Major Eddie Henwood and Captain Derek Clarke, Lieutenant Justin McPhee led a patrol to prevent four of the "enemy" escaping by boat.

Mr Finchett said the operation was "an excellent training opportunity" and lessons had been learned: "We worked very well together, using both FIG and BFSAI assets. It proved how easily both organisations can work together."

Exercise coordinator Major Archie Douglas said he was "thoroughly pleased" with how the exercise had been executed and the professionalism demonstrated throughout the ranks and from all departments.

Commander British Forces Commodore Philip Thicknesse added: "Such routine training exercises allow for the continued preparation and training, proving that military personnel and assets are fully prepared and highly capable and, as such, can efficiently work alongside the civilian agencies to protect the Islands should the need arise. The arduous conditions added to the realism and the troops had to give that much more to overcome both the weather and the enemy."

The FIG review had already transferred the Civil Aviation Department to Regulatory Services and placed it alongside Legal Services under the Corporate Director the Attorney General.

It is planned to expand the regulatory oversight capability to cover areas such as telecommunications and other monopolies. The Regulatory Services recently moved to offices in Stanley, therefore being further removed from the sections at Stanley Airport.

The FIGAS review included the recommendation that the Airport Fire Section, Stanley Airport and FIGAS Departments merge into one department. This did not include the Civil Aviation Department - the regulatory section.

# SAMA 82: caring for veterans and maintaining precious links

Having recently taken over as Chairman of the South Atlantic Medal Associaton (SAMA 82). Mike Bowles MBE has provided an update on the history and achievements of the charity which looks after and cares for British veterans of the 1982 war with Argentina.

I AM aware of the fact that although there are many Islanders who lived through the conflict still in the Islands today, there are many people who have come to live there since. For them in particular it may be useful or interesting to know a bit about the background of our Association

SAMA 82 was the brainchild of Rick Jolly, the Surgeon Commander RN, well known for his efforts in setting up and then operating the famous field hospital. the Red and Green Life Machine, at the meat packing station at Ajax

Rick's drive and enthusiasm, ably assisted by a couple of other prominent veterans including Denzil Connick of 3 Para and Tony Davies, who subsequently became the third Chairman of the Association, was the key to the success of SAMA to date. One of Rick's main achievements was to organise and lead a pilgrimage of 200 Veterans to the Islands in 2002 to mark the 20th anniversary of the conflict. This hugely successful event was followed in 2007 by a further pilgrimage for 250 veterans which I organised and led.

On both occasions we were looked after royally by Falkland Islanders and made to understand

them to be able to host groups of veterans and show their appreciation for what was achieved in 1982

On the latter pilgrimage SAMA linked up with Combat Stress and a number of the returning veterans were therefore

people registered as patients suffering from PTSD. It was gratify ing to know what a beneficial effect it had on these men to be able to return to the scenes of some horrifying experiences and to be able to put "ghosts to rest" as a

I will always remember very vividly, sometime after the pilgrimage in 2007, a Parachute Regiment veteran writing to me and saving that in the 25 years since the conflict had taken place he had always remembered the Falklands as some sort of "hell hole" where he had experienced atrocious conditions, brutal close quarters combat and the deaths and dreadful injuries of many friends. He had never managed to come to terms with it until his return in 2007.

During the Pilgrimage he discovered what a beautiful place the Islands were, how wonderfully friendly and still grateful for sacrifices made the Islanders were, and that he was able to return to UK at peace with himself and able

to say for the first time in 25 years that it had all been worthwhile

Rick stood down as Chairman in 2005 and was succeeded by Martin Reed. the Chief Officer of Canberra in 1982. The appointment of Martin as Chairman was very good for the Association as it highlighted the fact that membership was open to

any holder of the South Atlantic medal - the Merchant Navy of course earned many thousands of medals.

Martin did sterling work during his tenure in office in doing the groundwork to enable the Association to become a UK registered

He then handed over to Tony Davies, RSM of the Welsh Guards in 1982, who led us with great style and flair through the 25th anniversary commemorations in 2007. Tony continued until March this year when I took over.

Throughout the time SAMA has existed it has relied heavily on assistance from the Islands, and this has come in the form of a separate charity, SAMA Fl Trust.

In particular the sterling work done by the Trust has been vital in allowing the two major pilgrimages to take place. For the first Terry Peck was the Chairman and in 2007 it was Gary Clement. Both of these men did an enormous amount of work and without them, and their committees of assistants. the pilgrimages could not have taken place.

It is fitting to know that Gary Clement has recently been honoured with the appointment of MBE for his work in assisting veterans returning to the Islands, not only at the times of pilgrimages. but also on an on-going basis over the years. Terry, when he was alive, God bless him, and Gary have quite simply been magnificent in their dedication and support to SAMA

The aims of the Association are to look after and care for veterans of the conflict and to maintain the links that we have with the Islands. A personal aim of mine is to enable more veterans to return to the Islands who have never been back since 1982

Those who have not returned need to have the experience of my Parachute Regiment friend already quoted: "It is such a special place and you are such special people living there. Everyone who fought should have the opportunity to return and see what they were fighting for."

I will close by saying that the Islands are and will remain a very special place for me and for the veterans of the 1982 conflict.

They are unique and very British. For me it is an honour to have the chance to lead our Association and to continue to forge stronger and stronger relationships between veterans of that extraordinary operation in 1982 and the residents of the Falkland Islands of today.

God bless you all.

## Dry Ice: a gripping yarn

FORMER Falklands resident Fred Clark has had his second book published, this time a novel called Dry Ice.

## Chile's cold snap puts fruit prices on the rise

IF the price of fruit and vegetable prices soars in the next few weeks, it will be no fault of the importers and retailers in the Falklands, but rather inclement weather that has hit central and southern Chile so hard in the past week.

Production in these areas is expected to drop sharply, and there has already been a 20 per cent rise in fruit and vegetable prices in Chile.

Until this spell of bad weather fruit and vegetable growers had been anticipating a bonanza year.

Instead, orange exporters will most likely face a reduction of around 40 per cent in exports,

exporters expecting an overall 15 per cent decline. Although exports and sales are down, Valledor Trade, the main distribution centre in Santiago, ruled out the possibility of a

supply shortage. Nevertheless, the low temperatures will ensure smaller supplies.

Chile's National Federation of Fruit Producers (Fedefruta) Vice President Cristian Allendes said the loss in production volumes would be at least partially offset by increased prices: "Usually with these types of losses, prices will be raised by 25 per cent, which minimises the damage," he said.

# SBS officer steps back in time to his 1982 visit to the Islands

A FORMER Royal Marine Regimental Sergeant Major and now the secretary for the SBS Association. Willy Stocks returned to the Falklands for the first time last week since he took part in several operations crucial to the liberation of the Falklands from invading Argentine forces.

Then a 33-year-old SBS sergeant, Willy's first task was alongside the SAS and Royal Marines in the retaking of South Georgia. Although considered militarily insignificant, this was a great morale boost for the approaching task force, and the Islanders who were reassured that help was on the way, as well as the British public.

Fanning Head on East Falkland was the first Falklands soil Willy was to set foot on in an operation that was to make the planned amphibious landing at San Carlos a much safer exercise.

Equipped with heavy weapons, the Argentine position atop Fanning Head overlooking San Carlos Waters was a cause for concern and the task of clearing it fell to 2 SBS of which Willy was a member, along with 24 others, and accompanied by Captain Hugh McManners, a Naval Gunfire Forward Observation specialist.

Mission successfully accomplished, it was off to Teal Inlet where beach soundings for possible landings were undertaken and then he and his three team members were landed near a creek at the base of Estancia Mountain.

They made their way onto Long Island Mountain where they concealed themselves and observed the surrounding area.

Willy said their main task was to guide D Squadron - 22 SAS members - into the area, an operation which was later cancelled, and to see if there were any Argentine positions along the ridge.

It wasn't until later, when he made contact with Neil Watson at his farm at the base of the mountain, that he learned earlier that night Argentine helicopters had taken out the forces which had been positioned on the hillside.

Assured there weren't any Argentines in the area Willy's group made their way to Long Island farm house where they stayed with the Watson family for two nights.

"We learned a lot from Neil and he actually did a reconnaissance along the ridge on horseback to see if there were any Argentines still there," Willy told the Penguin News

Neil then transported Willy and his group back to the creek where they were picked up by boat and dropped off by helicopter on West Falkland in the Mt Philomel area opposite Chartres settlement.

Chartres had two very good airstrips at the time and the task was to establish whether Argentine aircraft were putting them to use. They spent two days overlooking the settlement and when it became apparent it was only inhabited by the Chartres residents and some refugees from Fox Bay. Willy and a member of his team decided to swim across to the settlement at the narrowest point from Gun Hill.

It was just a narrow stretch but one through which a fierce tide of up to nine knots can run, and Willy said there were moments when he wondered if he was going to make it: "We'd carried a lightweight diving suit but didn't have fins and in hindsight that was a mistake," he said.

It was a traumatic swim which lasted 45 minutes, struggling against the tide, unable to see either shore and unaware of the strength of the tide. On top of that all the air had been expelled from Willy's suit removing the extra buoyancy normally enjoyed in such a situation.

"It was a good job there weren't any Argies there, because it was a full ten minutes before we could function fully when we got to the shore," he said.

Willy and Mark made their way to the nearest house and made themselves known. Fox Bay West residents Peter and Glenda McGill were there with their two youngest children and Peter's elderly mother and stepfather. "Are you British?" Glenda asked, and when this was confirmed, she let it be known in no uncertain terms that it was very good news.

Several locals launched the wooden dinghy and made their way back across the creek to collect the other two and an air of excitement hung over the settlement. Contact had been made with the British after 72 days of uncertainty.

Each household eagerly awaited a visit from the men so they could show their gratitude

with hospitality in the form of tea, coffee, cakes and meals.

When, two days later, news of the surrender reached the settlement, it was time for a real party and the old bunk house came alive with dancing and merriment.

But the SBS men, in between attempts at mastering the quick step and Circassian Circle, still kept a close eye on the surrounding hills through their night-sights, more often than not accompanied by a local who would also scan the hills looking for anything untoward.

Willie and Co were picked up by helicopter and spent two days in Stanley, during which time they managed to get back out to Long Island to see the Watson family before they boarded the RFA Resource to head north.

But with a detour to South Georgia it was at least two weeks before they arrived in Ascension Island.

Willy said this was in fact a good thing as it had given them all time to wind down from the previous ten weeks.

He said he had never felt an urge or a need to return to the Falklands but, when the opportunity to pay tribute to Sergeant Hunt had come about, he had been the first to jump at the chance.

Willy stayed at Liberty Lodge during his week in the Islands and was very impressed with the entire set-up. He is now making preliminary arrangements for a pilgrimage in 2012, the 30th anniversary of the Falklands war, "primarily because of the SBS association and to recognise some of the campaigns we have been a part of over the years," he said.

Willy left the Falklands on Sunday and said he was looking forward to returning in two years time.



# Proof he hasn't lost his bottle

PHAROS Chief Engineer Jamie "Plex" Simpson has a habit of lobbing bottles containing messages overboard, and some of them have turned up in some unusual places.

Just recently a bottle containing the front page of the Penguin News from February 9 2007 washed up on Baylys Beach on the west coast of the North Island of New Zealand and was picked up by Ross Sherman.

As well as news from the Falklands, the page contained Jamie's name and contact details and the information that the bottle had been cast overboard between the Falklands and South Georgia.

Ross got in touch with the Penguin News when he failed to receive a reply from Jamie via the email address in the bottle. But then he does seem to prefer a less technical form of communication.

When the Pharos was last at FIPASS, we tracked Jamie down and asked if he made a habit of sending messages in bottles.

He said he had in the past, although less frequently of late, and it wasn't the first time one had washed ashore.

Several years ago one turned up in Brazil. It washed up in a

national park north of the equator and was found by a resident of a remote village.

As no one could talk English they held on to it until one day a teacher trekking in the jungle happened upon them and was shown the bottle and message. She then got in touch with Jamie to let him know that it had been picked up.

It's a romantic idea that something as fragile as a bottle with a slip of paper in it can travel thousands of miles in an often stormy ocean and be picked up by a stranger, so keep checking those beaches – there's more chance of getting a message from Jamie in a bottle, than in an email.





The Falklands Health **Promotion Group** continues its articles aimed at making our lives longer, safer

and healthier. This week we feature the first of four items on weight management ACCORDING to the

World Health Organisation (WHO), obesity is now the single greatest threat to health in

developed nations.

The costs of obesity to the individual and society are three-fold:

\* Health costs - for the individual. Obesity has an associated increased risk of health problems such as Type II diabetes, hypertension, myocardial infarction. colon cancer, angina, gall bladder disease, ovarian cancer, osteo arthritis or stroke. All these risks are considerably reduced with a moderate weight loss of only ten percent of current weight over one

Social costs - for the individual (social isolation, low selfesteem, depression, anxiety) and the negative impact on daily life (difficulty climbing stairs, bending and lifting, travelling comfortably, shopping for clothes, house-

work, etc).

\* Economic costs - in 2009 in the Falkland Islands we spent £64k on cardiovascular system drugs (£17k alone on anti hypertensives) and £23k on drugs to help with diabetes.



There are other "hidden and indirect costs" difficult to account for, like the number of sick days and working hours lost or the cost of other health problems associated to obesity. Why is obesity on the increase?

Increased consumption of fat and refined carbohydrates (ie sugar)

Declining levels of physical

activity

 Increased availability of cheap, energy-dense food against increased costs in the Falklands of healthy fresh fruit and vegetables

Increasing mechanisation and use of energy saving devices

It seems pretty obvious: if we intake more calories than we use.

we gain weight.

We could even blame our genetic setup. We haven't evolved genetically as a species as quickly as our technological development, When it comes to eating, our brains are still in the prehistoric era, when humankind had just got up on their two feet and they had to spend an awful lot of calories in the process of obtaining food by hunting. Therefore we are "programmed" to eat beyond our needs, our bodies storing up excess food as body fat, preventing us from starving in times when hunting wasn't that successful



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

LIZ works within the hospitality industry and is paid £6 an hour. She has no job contract, there is no safety net of sick pay if she falls ill, and her job can be terminated in an instant with no recourse. Her dissatisfaction arises not from the rate of pay, but the long hours and lack of security in her position. She is classified as a part-time worker, yet she regularly clocks up 50-hour weeks over a six-day week. She has Falklands Status.

"I want security from my job," says Liz. "We don't have any contract, so they could just close tomorrow with no warning. We compare what we do with others whose staff get five weeks paid holiday, Christmas holidays and sick pay. They have security."

She says she wants to take a holiday, but can't afford to as she won't get paid: "I have ideas to help the business as well, but right now I don't think it's worth my while. If I could see a future, then I would work a lot harder."

Liz also is concerned about how the system is perceived by people passing through the Islands: "For people coming down here as well, it can seem a bit backward, treating staff like that. What do they take away with them when they leave the Falklands?"

PHIL is employed as a full-time member of staff with benefits such as sick and holiday pay. He works in the retail industry for a hourly rate slightly less than £5, and by working 37 hours a week he doesn't earn enough money to pay tax. He is concerned about his co-workers.

"I have been told I'm full-time, yet I do fewer hours than everyone else, but I get all the benefits," says Phil. "All the part-time people, they're not guaranteed a job for a start. They could turn around and say 'OK, you're not needed anymore,' and they would have no



Stanley retail and hospitality workers have long been considered among the least protected in the Falklands. The lack of a minimum wage, so-called part-timers working in excess of 40 hours per week, and a lack of basic employment protection have conspired to create an underclass in the Islands' labour force. While the government has

pledged to address the issue as a matter of urgency, the Penguin News has spoken to four employees whose job grievances are genuine, and disturbing. case to fight. They don't get sick pay, they don't get holiday, they don't get lots of things."

He is also concerned that workers from other countries such as Chile get a bad deal: "We're meant to be part of the UK, which is meant to be a modern, western society. How can we say we're like a little England, when we're not? It is embarrassing, and actually quite disgraceful. I'm not overly discontent in my job, it's just little things that make it ridiculous. And they do expect a lot for very little."

Phil says he has no issues with his employer, but his gripes are with FIG: "I can't believe it's taken them this long to look at employment law. You really can be so screwed over by your employer. It's so strange they haven't done anything until now."

Along with the introduction of a minimum wage, maximum working week and better conditions, Phil believes regular breaks should be mandatory, and a definite priority for councillors should be to resolve a lack of health and safety procedures.

ANNE has hospitality industry qualifications pertinent to her job title, and is responsible for supervising some of her colleagues. She joined her employer several years ago and still receives the same pay as she did then, £6.50 an hour. She works variable hours, an aver-

age of 40 a week, with no sick or holiday pay, and no contract, as she is considered a part-time or casual worker. She too has Falklands Status

"A lot of the time, I feel all the effort I put into my job is for nothing," says Anne. "I've shown them loyalty but they haven't given me anything back."

She describes herself as "stressed and frustrated" with the situation as it stands, and says the lack of holiday and sick pay is detrimental to her quality of life: "You can't even be sick, because you lose money. I would like to go and see my family who live overseas, but I can't. I have had time off, but then I have to work double to make the money back."

Although Anne enjoys the company of her colleagues, and her chosen profession, she feels undervalued and under-appreciated: "I used to enjoy my job, but all of this makes it not enjoyable for me. People have left already, because of the way it is.

"I would like to start a family soon, but I can't as it is now, because we don't get any maternity pay, nothing like that. I don't even know if they would keep my job for me if I did. I've done this job for a long time, but there is no benefit to me."

ANDY works within the retail industry. He works a regular 45 hours a week in a dual parttime/full-time role, but he doesn't receive any benefits such as sick and holiday pay. He is paid £5 an hour, and needs a work permit to be employed in the Falklands. Some of his coworkers work from 7am-4pm before heading to their second place of employment, just to make ends meet.

"My pay doesn't cover the cost of living at all," says Andy. "If I was by myself I wouldn't be able to pay for my fuel, food and everything else. People are being taken advantage of. One person works from eight in the morning until eight in the evening because she needs the money."

He says there also is confusion as to the terms and conditions under which staff are employed: "We're not really sure what conditions we're employed under, and we all get different amounts of pay even though we're working the same hours pretty much."

"Some people do get holiday and sick leave, and a bigger Christmas bonus, but it doesn't seem to be dependent on whether you're local or not. I don't really know their criteria."

Andy is in favour of a law change, in particular the introduction of a minimum wage. But he is worried an increase in pay and better conditions may encourage more locals to apply for work with his employer, potentially putting his own position at risk.

As part of the FIG employment law review, questionnaires were delived to all mail boxes. Copies may be obtained from the Post Office, but the deadline for their return is today. The Penguin News has contacted a number of employers on employment law issues, and their responses will be published next week.

OPEN government is an interesting concept. According to Wikipedia: Open government is the governing doctrine which holds that the business of government and state administration should be opened at all levels to effective public scrutiny and oversight.

The online encyclopedia is written collaboratively, and could itself be described as a shining example of transparency in action.

So when Jan Cheek writes in her Assembly Diary (see page four), in reference to public meetings, that "if we have not aired some subjects as openly as you would like, it is with the good reason that the Falklands audience is not the only one hearing the rebroadcast on FIRS," how are we to take that?

It would appear we are being told public meetings are open only up to a point, and that certain subjects are too sensitive to discuss in a publicly broadcast forum. Judging from audience comments at recent meetings, they too seem to be a little muted these days.

Perhaps the presence of a microphone thrust under one's nose is another deterrent for some to speak their mind.

No one can force Assembly members to discuss topics they feel are best not repeated on radio. And, to be fair, certain sentiments are sometimes best aired discreetly.

So why not hold public meetings that encourage any subject to be openly discussed, simply by restricting the terms of its broadcast?

Do we not want to see no-holds barred debate between Assembly members and those who voted them in?

lam told, before the radio broadcasts began, public meetings used to be much livelier affairs. They served to demonstrate clearly where the barometers of community and councillor opinion truly stood and whether or not they were in sync.

Our FIRS colleagues may not agree with restrictions on broadcasts; nor may their listeners. Although FIRS would not be prevented from reporting after the event, in much the same way as ourselves.

But there is doubtless a dilemma if the broadcasting of these meetings serves to restrict the very transparency we are seeking

It is a prickly issue, and feedback would be interesting from all quarters - as long as we don't end up accepting the Yes Minister version of open government where, according to the law of inverse relevance: "The less you intend to do about something, the more you have to keep talking about it."

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# BP shares held by FIG not at risk: Padgett

FINANCIAL ripples in the wake of the BP Gulf of Mexico oil spill disaster are reaching Falklands shores - but Financial Secretary Keith Padgett said the Falkland Islands Government investment in the company was not considered a high risk

BP announced on Tuesday it had taken a pre-tax charge of £32 billion for the oil spill, with shares falling dramatically since the disaster unfolded in April

FIG holds shares in BP worth about £1.7million, representing around one per cent of the value of the government's total investment portfolio.

However, Mr Padgett said while the holdings were "a meaningful sum" in absolute terms, exposure to the stock was not as high as in FIG's many other portfolios of UK shares.

Mr Padgett said: "Our investment managers recommended that we held onto the shares because BP is a global oil major with one of the best reserve replacement profiles, and the share price was (and will be again be) supported by a very good dividend.

The FIG investment relates to the Growth Fund and the Pensions (Old Scheme) Fund, both of which are concerned with long-term growth rather than short-term profit-taking. Mr Padgett said

FIG's analysts estimated the loss in market value caused by the share price falling would recover over time, and that the stock was currently undervalued.
"This is because the true situ-

ation has been somewhat masked by US domestic politics," he said.

"However, at the end of the day, the US needs oil and BP is the largest oil company in the US. In addition, if the politics were to deteriorate to the extent that the company ends up being broken up, itself a very unlikely scenario, then there would be plenty of bidders for BP's assets from the Middle East and elsewhere.

Mr Padgett concluded: "If the shares continue to recover then we may reassess our holdings. However, selling shares in the throes of these problems when the balance sheet position of the company, its cash flows and reserve positioning suggest the company is undervalued, does not seem the best course of action.

BP's group chief executive Tony Hayward said on Tuesday that with the oil leak now capped a significant milestone had been reached, and the company was poised to move forward.

"By disposing of assets worth more to others than to BP we can better align our strategic footprint with our global strengths," he said.

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# Mock disaster exercises test African port emergency services teams

STANLEY became a disaster zone this week as a helicopter crashed into the Power Station, wiping out passengers and crew, and a family of seven perished in a house fire

But it was only the scenario that was shocking, as emergency services were put through their paces in two separate exercises

The helicopter accident on Tuesday was the scene of a major incident exercise planned by FIDF Major Peter Biggs and led by government officials.

About 100 people were involved, including FIDF, police, hospital and fire crews, as well as observers and mock casualties

They were told power was lost to the whole of Stanley and pump relay teams were deployed to source water from Stanley harbour.

"It tested and proved the command and control capabilities and on the whole it was a worthwhile and successful exercise," said Major Biggs.

Fire crews and police were again tested on Wednesday night when they were called to a house fire in John Street. They were told a manwas trapped upstairs by the smoke, and six family members

were in difficulties downstairs. What made this all the more testing was that those involved did not know it was an exercise until part way through.

Incident Commander Edward Nielson, sub officer at the Fire Station, said: "We all thought it was real until the BA (breathing apparatus) team came across the first casualty and realised it was a training dummy. The training kicked in and the guys themselves performed how we would expect

From the time of the call to when we retrieved the casualties and checked the building for structural damage it was 43 minutes. They did very well."

# And Argos makes five in race for oil riches

ARGOS Resources announced yesterday its entire issued share capital of more than 216 million shares at 2p each had been admitted to trading on the AIM market of the London Stock Exchange.

Formed in 1995, the company is led by geologist John Hogan, who worked on Lasmo's attempts to find oil in 1997. It is the fifth company to join the search for oil around the Falklands

Argos Resources has a 100 per cent interest in Production Licence PL001 in the North Falkland Basin. Two wells were drilled on the acreage in 1998 but were plugged and abandoned as uncommercial after having oil shows. PL001 adjoins areas being explored by Rockhopper Exploration and Desire Petroleum, who are leading players in the ongoing 2010 Falklands drilling campaign

Mr Thomson said he was delighted with the success of the equity fund raising to date and would be pleased to welcome new shareholders to Argos: "The potential for significant oil and gas reserves in the Falkland Islands region has been the subject of speculation for some considerable time," he said. "Recent discoveries in the North Falkland Basin, where Argos has its licence, have not only conclusively proven a working petroleum system and indicated potential significant reserves upside, but have also de-risked further exploration drilling within this northern basin.

"Investor interest in the Falkland Islands is strong and Argos, with its seven identified prospects and five leads, believes now is a good time to raise the funds to support its own 3D seismic pro-

### Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

FIRST, apologetic congratulations to our successful shearers. Until I heard Lee Molkenbuhr's comment on FIRS I had not thought of shearing as a sport, but clearly this is another area where Falkland Islanders can compete on equal terms.

ANOTHER apology in advance of Tuesday's public meeting, although you will read this later. If we have not aired some subjects as openly as you would like, it is with the good reason that the Falklands audience is not the only one hearing the rebroadcast on FIRS. Medium wave and internet broadcasting can be picked up almost anywhere. Some South American countries may favour "megaphone diplomacy" but I would argue that it would not be to our advantage. I REPEAT my plea for feedback on the Economic Development Strategy. I know that some parts are controversial and we need to take a wide range of views into account before it is finalised. The information we received from the Chamber of Commerce council last week was interesting as were the valid reservations expressed.

A MISSING word in last week's PN front page housing item might be misleading. The relevant part of the fifth paragraph should read: "...people who do not own a house and have not previously benefited from a subsidised plot," This is important because, while we want to encourage house building, if it is a commercial venture it should not attract the subsidy available to an individual who plans to live in the property.

THE uptake of the recently released tranche of plots gives a good indication of the level of demand and will help us decide how to progress further releases. Other sites have been identified for early release but great care needs to be taken to avoid too much inappropriate infill. I have already seen an increase in numbers of active vegetable gardens and we may need more in the future. When Roger Edwards highlighted the price of cabbage at the last Assembly meeting, I realised I had never bought one. I prefer to grow my own.

# More pencilled in after three-month road trial

TWO new road crossings and a footpath linking the Infant Junior School to Ross Road are on the drawing board as the three-month trial to reverse traffic flow along Pencil Lane is set to begin.

After many months of negotiation and consultation, the trial gets under way on August 10.

Traffic will then enter from Ross Road and exit into John Street, as part of ongoing efforts to improve road safety and ease congestion around the school.

The Penguin News highlighted the issue in September last year when parents said growing congestion was creating daily risks to their children, and police warned motorists to avoid adding to the danger by parking in prohibited areas.

A working group was set up to tackle the twin problems of limited parking space and growing traffic. Both were exacerbated by expansion of the school within its limited perimeter, and the increasing habit of parents driving their children to school.

IJS head teacher Nick Barrett said: "We want to make the area around the school as safe as we possibly can. That's our priority."

Since then, four new crossings have been established around the Villiers-John Street junction, and the former crossing by the Gift Shop in Villiers Street has been

removed. The Pencil Lane project is the next step in addressing traffic-related challenges in the area.

Bob Hancox, road engineer for the PWD highways section, said the move offered three key benefits: "First off it will give more space for vehicles to queue and manoeuvre around those waiting for passengers at the exit to the Infant Junior School.

"Secondly, it will allow passengers to get in and out of vehicles on the safe side, the passenger side of the vehicle, straight onto the footpath, rather than into the flow of traffic. And, theoretically, the third point, it should enable

vehicles to leave Pencil Lane more quickly and get onto John Street and disperse around town."

While other problems remain unresolved – particularly the demand from parents for more designated parking spaces close to the school – Councillor Gavin Short, who holds the transport portfolio, said it was still a step in the right direction.

"This isn't a complete solution, not by any stretch of the imagination," he acknowledged. "It may be that perhaps we

"It may be that perhaps we will contemplate going one way on John Street, or at least a section of it, but let's just see how this goes first.

"It's better than sitting around for another three or four years, scratching our ears and saying what do we do?".

"Let's just try this, see how it goes, and we'll take it from there."

At Tuesday's public meeting, Cllr Short urged members of the public to offer him feedback on the trial and related proposals.

Cllr Emma Edwards also backed a suggestion that lollipop man Willie Bowles controlled traffic from the centre of the Villiers-John Street junction.

The new road crossings and footpath have already been approved, and work could start on those as soon as the trial is completed in November.

# Ocean of opportunity for St Helena airport

WHILE news of a new airport for St. Helena is signalling an unprecendented era of growth for the South Atlantic territory, its strategic and economic benefits are going to be felt much further afield.

Although UK Government officials have emphasised the decision is based purely on the needs of the St Helenians – to help them become self-sufficient and eliminate their reliance on £20m of aid each year – the move is seen by some as shoring up Britain's interests in the wider region.

The 47 square mile island lies 1.400 miles west of its nearest mainland port, Walvis Bay in Namibia, and 1.800 miles east of the coast of Brazil. Its nearest neighbours are on Ascension Island, 800 miles north and the hub of the Falklands-UK military airbridge.

An air link to Ascension will have an enormous impact on residents and visiting families, allowing Saints from both the Falklands and the UK to visit the island in hours rather than days.

Up until now their only lifeline has been the RMS St Helena, a merchant vessel which takes a week to sail to Cape Town, and two weeks to the UK.

But according to the international media, the new airport also could serve as the hub of a second airbridge between the Falklands and the UK.

The UPI media agency this week quoted "analysts" as saying the announcement appeared driven by concerns over the "continuing tense stand-off" between Britain and Argentina.

It even estimated flying time between St Helena and the Falklands at 7:40 hours to cover 3,812 miles, with large aircraft able to be accommodated on a new type of runway.

"UK forces destined for combat duty in Afghanistan and Iraq have been training in the Falklands," reported UPL "An airport in St Helena would significantly facilitate traffic between the Falklands and destinations in the UK and beyond."

However, Governor of St Helena Andrew Gurr told the Penguin News: "I have no awareness that the Falklands featured at all in the thinking about the airport.

"Indeed the runway length is said to be suitable for a long range 737 - that is hardly long enough for the kind of capacity that the airbridge requires.

"The Saints on the Falklands would be helped by having a flight between here and Ascension. Indeed the whole issue of the nature of the use of Ascension becomes relevant."

Mr Gurr also said it could pave the way for unique opportunities in tourism: "In the medium to long term I am confident that an airport here will lead to far greater cooperation between the Falklands and the other South Atlantic Overseas Territories.

"There will be significant development and investment opportunities here, and the possibility of multi-centre holidays is interesting. There is enormous variety in tourist appeal between the three islands: scenery and history here, warm sandy beaches with turtles on Ascension, and the world class wildlife and battle sites of the Falklands."

He also acknowledged the strategic benefits to the UK: "Having two airports in mid-Atlantic more than doubles the strategic capabil-

ity of the UK within the zone. That would be beneficial if such is required by the Falklands or indeed parts of Africa or South America. Those two continents are the last major undeveloped areas of the world; sitting between them can only be useful."

Strict conditions are attached to the airport plan, but Mr Gurr said most people would expect it to be operational by 2015.

Meanwhile, the island also is looking forward to a huge boost in employment opportunities through construction and tourism.

"As far as jobs are concerned we anticipate a substantial number," Mr Gurr told the Penguin News. "There will be the construction phase, not merely of the airport but of hotels and other infrastructural projects, and once we have flights we will need staff to man the tourist industry. It cannot be based on cruise ships, as is yours, but has to cater for around 30,000 tourists per year eventually. If we take seasonality into account we will need accommodation for about 2,000 people, plus those who service them.

"We do have 710 habitable but unoccupied homes, but their use for tourists depends on the owners - some of whom will be in the Falklands at present. So there is a great deal of building to be done."

John Clifford, St Helena Government Representative in the Falklands, said: "Given all the problems being caused by Argentina there is very good cause for links to our north to be strengthened. A direct link to St Helena opens up a line to South Africa and beyond: that alone is probably worth pursuing."

# Tussac planted in place of mines

OVER the course of two weekends Falklands Conservation staff and volunteers led by Dr Rebecca Upson, Falklands Conservation's Plant and Habitats Officer, have carried out restoration work on two sites recently cleared of mines.

With the help of 20 volunteers, tussac grass was planted on coastal peat at the Canache side of the Surf Bay former minefield SA-008. In contrast bluegrass was planted on the sand dunes within the same mine-cleared area.

This work has occurred because soil erosion is a major concern across the Falkland Islands for farmers and conservationists alike. Coastal areas are particularly vulnerable and require urgent attention. In some coastal areas it is appropriate to plant tussac, and many such projects have and are

currently taking place across the Islands. At other sites where the ground has eroded to sand or clay, tussac planting is not appropriate.

Restoration trials are therefore needed to develop methods for reclaiming large areas which are currently devoid of vegetation. It is in this context that Falklands Conservation is working with the Falkland Islands Government to carry out restoration trials on recently cleared minefields. The data gathered will be used to inform best practices at other sites.

# Saints score a political point AFTER decades of very justifi-

AFTER decades of very justifiable campaigning, St Helena is to get an airport. Saints at home, in the Falklands and around the world must be celebrating. I'm happy for them too.

But why has it taken the UK Government so long to accept its duty of care towards one of its few remaining colonies? Such an aid project is not an act of generosity but one of responsibility, and it should have been approved and acted upon decades ago.

At times 1 thought St Helena would have to be invaded before it would get what it so obviously deserved and needed.

The Falklands had similar trouble back in the early 1970s. After the Communications Agreement of 1972 between London and Buenos Aires. Argentina was quick to lay a temporary airstrip and provide the scheduled LADE air service. But London was tardy in the extreme to fulfil its part of the deal.

It did build the short permanent airport in 1975/76 (it was only long enough to handle flights from South America), and never did provide the surface shipping service that they had signed up for, and which would have given us a degree of independence from Argentina.

Of course, all that changed after 1982. Suddenly we had a multi-

million pound runway onto which jumbo jets were descending, and ships queuing up in Port William.

Five years ago, the Saints thought they had their longed-for airport, but the Labour government, quite unaccountably, cancelled the project. I could see no logic behind their U-turn then.

However, it could be that there was no high-level supporter, and no important domestic constituency whose pleasure would have benefited the government. Saint's did not vote and did not have enough friends.

So why has the project been revived now and given fast track

to approval? After all, this government is slashing expenditure left right and centre. It came as a huge surprise.

But then, the Saints do now have a powerful friend close to the new government.

Various newspapers have reported that Lord Ashcroft, the billionaire and one of the Tory's most important benefactors, is a vocal supporter of the Saints.

Speaking from his seat in the Lords recently, he asked pointedly what the government's plans were regarding the airport.

Speculation is rife this was a rhetorical question, and that he knew the government would give him what he wanted.

Should such party-political issues have such sway over spending? You decide.

But when schools and hospital development projects, and the careers of hundreds of thousands of British civil servants are being scrapped, plenty of people in this country would have a strong opinion.

Does it really matter? The Saints will have their airport, and, as I said, they deserve it.

But we should not be naive about the relationship between aid and politics. It's nothing new, as those who were in the Falklands in the 1970s know. It's just political pragmatism. Be assured. Saints: you are no more loved by the mother country now than you were a month ago.

### It's a bug's life for small birds

THIS may not be an original thought, but it has occurred to me that nature has succeeded where the Argentines failed. The earwig invasion now appears to be complete. The creatures have consolidated their bridgehead, and are clearly in control.

I had always assumed the bugs sported their name because they were thought to have a tendency to burrow their way into the ears of humans. But no. A friend told me their name comes from the medieval moniker "arse-wiggler." And, when you think about it, this is about right. Their little bottoms do tend to do the cha-cha-cha.

But this is a serious business. Earwigs exist in the UK too. It seems they have predators in the UK, but none in the Falklands.

I suspect the predators are mainly bug-eating small birds. It is noticeable there are not many around Stanley, where earwigs are concentrated, but there are many cats, and cats scoff little birds.

There I had better leave it, because if I am not careful I am going to be suggesting the extermination of all kitties, and I love the little fur bags. But it may go to show that when we start messing with the balance of nature, things can get out of hand.



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# Eradicating invasive species on our islands: how far do we go?

THE article "South Georgia's ambitious bid to rid island of rodents," printed in the July 16 edition of the Penguin News, I thought interesting and I hope the project will be successful.

The use of a helicopter to spread poisonous bait, in this case a cereal in pellet form, is I imagine the only practical method that can be used in the terrain of South Georgia. This method has been shown to work and has been commonly used, for example on New Zealand's offshore islands, to eradicate rodents and other nonnative species.

Although the objectives, to eradicate invasive species, are perhaps the same, the South Georgia environment is very different from that of the Falklands.

I have no knowledge and am certainly not in a position to comment on what methods could be used successfully on South Georgia. However, I do have some concerns when I learn that aerial spreading of poisoned bait might be considered as a method to use in the Falklands.

Some years ago, I was approached by a New Zealand eradication expert on the possibility of using this aerial-borne system for eradicating the Black Rat from New Island. Apart from the enormous cost of the operation, I was opposed to such a project, at least until field research could be carried out on the target species.

This proved to be a prudent move, as we learned a lot more about both the Black Rat and mice and their minimal effect on the island's wildlife.

At the same time we looked at the implications posed by aerial distribution of bait and its possible effect on other species and concluded that an eradication programme of these particular species was not justified. There is some good progress being made in these Islands on efforts to eradicate the Norway Rat from small offshore

islands and I endorse this. However, it is hoped that using the method employed presently can continue, ie hand distribution of poison bait in wax block form, a formula aimed directly at the target species

On New Island we use wax blocks and a grain-based bait as a control measure: laid in the autumn, this is injected by hand through plastic pipe inserted deep into the base of our gorse bushes. Here the bait is available to rats and mice, but not to other species.

It is perhaps inevitable that having launched into the control and eradication of invasive species, especially rodents, with some success, there is the incentive to continue.

This has been made easier by the financial backing of governments and associated bodies. But should we be looking a little more deeply into some of the other costs of this eradication?

It does seem that one species, the Cobb's Wren, is a major catalyst behind the efforts to rid islands in the Falklands of rats: this is fine as long as we know there must be a limit to assisting one species before sacrificing others.

For an eradication programme to be successful, for example on New Island, a helicopter laying a blanket of bait over the entire surface of the island would have been required. One would plan to carry out such an operation in the non-breeding season when some spe-

cies would have migrated, but what of those species resident all the year round?

Cereal-based bait in pellet form could very easily be ingested by those grazing species, Upland, Ruddy-headed and Kelp geese.

Even some passerines, thrushes in particular, would be vulnerable. Waterways, ponds and tidal zones would be affected, endangering a variety of other species, freshwater and marine ducks.

A lot of consideration was given to our populations of raptors and, although it was possible to show that Striated Caracaras in particular had an aversion to both live and dead rodents, geese af-

fected by poison and scavenged by raptors would be a potential danger to these birds.

Although perhaps considered low risk, one should also take into account the residual effects left by this form of baiting.

Rockhopper Penguin. King Cormorant and Black-browed Albatross colony sites are common breeding grounds for mice and could not be excluded from bait laying


Visit one of these mixed colonies early in the breeding season and watch albatross building their nests with clay, mud and ground debris, and this raises another important question: what are the residual effects from this bait going to be on these birds? I am sure the manufacturers of such bait will claim in such situations there will be no harm, but who will give a guarantee on this?

Adding a few more Cobb's Wren to what is already an impressive collection of birds, perhaps at the cost of some species we already have, is where I would personally draw a line.





The Falklands Health Promotion Group continues its series of columns aimed at making our lives longer, safer and healthier. This week features the second of four articles on weight management...

FOLLOWING the Stone Age era (hunting days) we started taming animals into cattle, reducing the workload, developed agricultural techniques and so on until the world we live in today, where obtaining food takes very little action (depending which side of the hill you live on and whether you use your car or not in the case of Stanley – people from Camp still have to work for their fair share).

But our brains are still unable to tell us: "That's enough eating for today – we don't need any more!" So it takes a conscious effort and some willpower to try and keep the excess weight off. And, of course, getting the facts right. Here are some of the most common weight loss myths:

\* Myth: foods like celery, grapefruit or cabbage can burn fat and make you lose weight.

Fact: although they are healthy choices, no foods can burn fat. A healthy, balanced diet is the key to success.

\* Myth: fresh fruit and vegetables are more nutritious than tinned or frozen.

Fact: tinned or frozen fruit and vegetables are often packed immediately after picking and this helps them to keep their nutrients allowing them to be just as valuable as fresh produce. If using tinned fruit make sure they are in natural juice and not syrup (sugar in disguise).

\* Myth: starchy foods are fattening and should be avoided when trying to lose weight.

Fact: foods such as pasta, rice, potatoes and bread are the main source of carbohydrate and are an important supply of fuel for the body.

\* Myth: people who are trying to lose weight should not eat red meat.

Fact: most meat contains some saturated fat but also vital nutrients. Care should be taken with portion sizes but always go for lean cut meat (no visible fat) or trim off any extra fat and use low-fat cooking methods. We all know what happens to the rich juice of roast mutton when it cools off in the roasting tray (yes, it becomes white solid fat and we've eaten far too much of it already).

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

#### Research into Salmonids and Galaxiids

# Workers urged to join union to fight for rights

ASSEMBLY member and former union boss Gavin Short has called on all employees in the Falklands to join the General Employees Union, as the debate over employment law reforms gathers momentum.

"My personal opinion is that it is sad that it has to come to legislation to try and obtain dignified wages and conditions for workers," he wrote to the Penguin News (see letters, page 6).

He said the government review of employment law aimed to be fair, and good employers had nothing to be worried about.

But he added: "There is a union here and I would strongly advise all workers to join."

His successor at the GEU, Donald Betts said: "A minimum wage is something that is essential in any community."

"The old ordinance was put into place in 1989. I think now it has come to the time when it needs a major overhaul."

Some employees, he said, were being exploited and treated unfairly: "The majority of the problem appears to be with people who have moved here to work, such as those employees from Chile and St Helena.

"I think it's fairly widespread. A lot of people didn't realise that the workers' protection ordinance was there."

Mr Betts said he also would like to see the maximum working week prioritised, together with other conditions such as maternity, sick leave and basic leave.

Meanwhile, some employers are defending their right to not be subject to a minimum wage.

Andy Brownlee, Director of Lifestyles said: "I do not support a minimum hourly rate. The government should not dictate to the private sector what they should pay its employees.

# Introduction of a minimum wage to be given priority

MLA Roger Edwards this week told the Penguin News he and his fellow Assembly colleagues were strongly in favour of a minimum wage.

"It's very important," he said. "It was one of the eight top requirements when we first got elected.

"There are an awful lot of folk who work part-time, as much as 60 hours a week, and aren't protected by employment law. We do believe people are being taken advantage of, and getting very low wages, being

offset by unrealistic benefits in kind, such as food and accommodation.

"Once you start looking at a minimum wage, it throws up lots of other issues. The whole thing has to be looked at with two main points: minimum wage and employee

protection. We feel very strongly that there should be a minimum wage. What that level is, we haven't quite decided.

"We're hoping for an ExCo paper with all recommendations on it by November."

He said: "We believe if you pay well, you get a quality product. Our policy is not to refuse any reasonable request from a staff member. In return we hope our small staff repay these policies with similar consideration for the business. We find that it has worked very well for the last three years. We do have a small staff which does help in achieving that."

Cathy Jacobsen of the Victory Bar said: "If we go by the UK rules and regulations, we should go by the wage as well. Especially with the price of food and other things down here."

Some employers also remain cautious: "It all depends what the minimum wage terms will be," said Carl Stroud, Manager of the Malvina House Hotel.

"The rule of thumb is that user pays, so it could see the room rates, drink prices, etc going up to pay for it. Unfortunately retail and hospitality are the lowest paid industries there are. If the rate set is ridiculous, the price will go up."

Owen Summers, General Manager of Falkland Landholdings said: "I don't particularly think we have a problem with it as far as FLH goes. A lot of guys might say they have a low wage, but that doesn't take into account benefits in kind. Our guys get rent and free fuel. A lot depends upon what value you place on these benefits."

But employment conditions for part-timers remains a thorny issue for many employers.

Only last week – on the day the Penguin News ran its lead story "Worried workers want employment law change" – FIC General Manager Roger Spink distributed documents to all his employees outlining their job terms and conditions.

Asked by the Penguin News what had prompted him to do so on Friday, he said: "There were some employees who hadn't been handed them earlier. We made sure on Friday that everyone had received and signed for their terms and conditions. Most of them already had them."

"When you see something in the newspaper, that people haven't been handed them, you make sure they have them, don't

On the government's move to introduce a minimum wage, Mr Spink said: "We'll have to see what the final proposals are, the effect on the economy and people's jobs. The effect of a minimum wage on inflation, employment and business viability in Stanley, Camp and MPA, and possibly on shipping, needs to be assessed carefully to ensure the possible results of any introduction are fully understood. The last survey indicated that MPA would bear the brunt of any change in rates."

setting of a minimum hourly rate is not the way to do it in my view."

Owner of Stanley Growers and Nurseries, Tim Miller said: "There is freedom of movement of labour within the Islands, and those who take up what may be their first job coming in to the Islands surely know in advance the hours and conditions on offer and can choose not to take the job.

"I have yet to be convinced at all that there is much wrong with current employment legislation.

"We have internal self-government so we have no requirement to slavishly follow everything UK does just because they do it," he

"I would see changes as currently proposed as probably detrimental to the economic prosperity of the Islands - remember FIG gets its money only from a healthy private sector."

Others, though, support the case for minimum pay.

John Clifford of Saddle Direct said it was "about bloody time."

# Go-ahead for 19 more house plots

NINETEEN more housing lots were given planning permission at yesterday's Planning and Building Committee.

Despite several objections to the proposal for the provision of seven fully serviced housing plots to the east of Kent Road and the west of the play park area on Snake Hill, planning permission was granted. The area was re-designated as suitable for residential development in the Stanley Town Plan Alteration Document and it was suggested the area was in a bad state and housing development would not worsen the conditions.

On the other hand it was suggested seven new houses would increase congestion on Kent Road. The proposal of a metalled driveway within the new development was not agreed as it was considered more logical to construct a properly surfaced road to serve the northern most plots.

The construction of new government housing at 27, 29, 31 and 33 Hansen Hill, 53 and 55 Ross Road East and 12, 14, 16, 18, 20 and 22 Sulivan Street was also approved

Other applications for full

planning permission approved were the creation of a link corridor between workshop facilities for Cable and Wireless; development of a container park, bund and erection of 2.4m fence for FIG on vacant land on the northeast corner of the Airport Road and FIPASS Road; demolition of dwellings and outline permission for erection of two dwellings for Stanley Services Ltd, at 76 and 78 Davis Street

A further two applications for planning permission were refused: erection of a dwelling at the rear of 10 Barrack Street for Graham Bound, and permission to board over doors on the north and south side of the porch at the Tabernacle, Barrack Street. An off-street parking grant application for Jaqui Jennings and Allan White on Davis Street was also refused.

An application for the installation of foul and surface water lines to service five proposed housing plots for FIG on vacant land on the north side of Anderson Drive, east of 8 Anderson Drive, was deferred pending a further round of public consultation using an accurate description of the proposal.

# Survey endorses new workplace legislation

SEVENTY per cent of respondents to the government's recent questionnaire on employment law say changes to legislation are of "great importance" to them.

And, in a further endorsement of employment law reform, 90 per cent say changes should apply to all businesses regardless of size and type.

More than 100 people responsed to the policy department's questionnaire, circulated to Post Office boxes in recent weeks.

A significant majority of respondents felt that increased regulations would have a positive impact on both the Falklands as a place to do business and also the perception of the Islands as a place to live and work.

Minimum wage was identified as a definite priority for the respondents, with ill health benefits and health and safety the second and third priorities. Following these, people felt a contract of em-

ployment was important, followed by employment rights for casual and part-time workers and a maximum working week.

There were also those who would like to see improvements to annual leave entitlement, anti-discrimination protection, family leave entitlements, grievance and arbitration procedures and protection of employment benefits following a takeover.

Other areas listed in responses were contracts within the workplace and access to informa-

tion, immigration, being able to appoint the best candidate for the job, and insurance policies such as workers' compensation.

Seven per cent of respondents said they were content with the current provisions, and four per cent opposed any changes to the current legislation.

Six per cent believed changes should apply only to medium to large sized businesses (including FIG) with over 15 employees.

Senior Economist Michael Poole said: "It's surprising actually, the number of people who listed health and safety at work."

"Another thing that became apparent is that some individuals, and employers as well, have no knowledge of the current ordinance.

"ExCo have agreed to hold a public information exercise on the current ordinance. It's just that it's not enforced at all, and people barely know it's there," he said.

## Drafts in order

**EXECUTIVE** Council has considered ongoing legislative drafting for the remainder of 2010. The July Assembly passed the Mental Health Bill and the Falkland Islands Status (Amendment) Bill. The October meeting will consider the Public Health (Prohibition of Smoking) Bill, Livestock and Meat Products Bill and a Bill for the Medical Services Levy. In November the Taxes (Amendment) Bill (provisionally), the Statistics Bill and Telecommunications (Amendment) Bill will be considered

## Freak wave hits

THE MoD supply ship Hurst Point recently hit some bad weather, resulting in cargo and vehicles being damaged. Captain Peter Stapleton said Hurst Point encountered an unavoidable, unusually large wave 400 miles north of the Falkland Islands in a 54 knot wind: "The wave went up and over the turtle deck and caused significant damage to the cargo that was on deck," he said.

## MSL updated

EXECUTIVE Council last week considered detailed policy points on the proposed re-introduction of the Medical Services Levy. They agreed self-employed people should pay a flat rate of 1.5% on earnings as there was a risk those who employed others could have paid in excess of 2.5%. All bounties paid by Fire, Police and FIDF will be exempt.

# Dog dose trial

THE dosing of dogs is to be suspended for one treatment in order for the Department of Agriculture to conduct a trial on all dogs in the Falklands in the continued mission to eradicate hydatitosis. The next dosing of dogs will take place on October 6.

## For the birds

FALKLAND Islands Tourist Board is heading off to the Birdfair at Egleton Nature Reserve in the UK from August 20-22. Billed as the birdwatchers' Glastonbury, it is the world's largest birdwatching event.

# Optician fee

PEOPLE who wear contact lenses but have not had them prescribed for medical purposes will have to pay for an additional optician appointment, Executive Council agreed last week.

## Take-off at last

SATURDAY's outgoing LAN Chile flight finally left the Falklands at 3.30am yesterday after poor weather in Santiago and at MPA caused delays to its scheduled departure and arrival.

# Legal firm explains basic rights for all employees

As part of the Penguin News investigation into employment law in the Islands, McGrigors trainee lawyer Jennifer Louch has listed key points detailing the current employment legislation, that employees, and indeed employers in the Falklands may not be aware of.

Contract of Employment

ALL employees taken on for 16 hours or more weekly shall be given a written statement by their employer setting out the main particulars of employment. The employer is required to specify (among other details):

• The date employment began

The rate, method and intervals at which remuneration is to be paid
Terms and conditions relating to

hours of work, entitlement to holidays, holiday pay, sick pay and pension schemes

pension schemes

The length of notice which the employee is obliged to give and entitled to receive

 Details of any disciplinary rules and grievance procedures

Wage slips

AN employee is entitled to be given an itemised written pay statement at or before the time they are paid. This should set out the gross and net pay, any deductions and reasons for such deductions.

Time off

ALL employees are entitled to reasonable unpaid time off work to deal with an emergency involving a dependant, ie if a dependant falls ill or if the arrangements for care break down. Time off shall also be given should an employee need to seek medical and dental attention.

Maternity and Paternity leave AN employee who is absent from work wholly or partly because of pregnancy is entitled to paid time off for six weeks in the form of statutory maternity pay and to return to work thereafter.

Maternity pay must be paid provided that:

• As at the 11th week before the due date, the employee has been employed continuously by the same employer for a period of two years (ie at the expected date of the birth, an employee must have been employed for a period of two years and 11 weeks)

• Before the absence begins, the employee gives to the employer 21 days written notice stating that she will be absent and stating whether she intends to return to work.

Maternity pay is to be paid by her employer and is calculated at nine tenths of a week's pay. There is no entitlement to paid paternity leave in the Falkland Islands.

Notice period

BOTH an employer and employee are entitled to receive a minimum period of notice on termination of the employment contract. This minimum is unaffected by longer service.

An employer must give at least one week's notice after one month's continuous employment.

This rises to two weeks notice after two years of continuous employment. After three years this increases to three weeks, and so on, up to a maximum of 12 weeks after 12 years of continuous employment.

Within employment law, generalising to a large extent should be avoided. It is worth noting that employment contracts may increase these rights for employees. The points listed are only statutory minimums. The employment contract, if one exists, should be checked in the first instance.

# Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

I SHOULD have been forwarding this from my holiday hotel instead of a snowy home scene as the fortnight of self indulgence I had promised myself shrinks.

LAST week was very busy with a particularly interesting discussion on how the proposed Medical Services Levy will be applied fairly. An early and obvious conclusion was that MLA allowances should be liable for MSL. They were exempt under the previous legislation but must not be when the new legislation is brought forward. Special provision is also proposed for the self-employed so that instead of paying the equivalent of employer and employees' contributions, they would only pay 1.5%. This is of course subject to the publishing. discussion and passing of the relevant legislation before the end of the year.

WE tread a tightrope in allowing public meetings to be broadcast. I understand that many like to hear what is being discussed and cannot attend. This must be balanced against the natural reluctance of some attendees to speak into a microphone and the obvious danger of sharing sensitive information which could assist those who wish our country harm. More positively I know of no other country where the entire elected government meets in this way with its electorate. It is valuable in getting a feel for public opinion and an early warning when there are potential problems. It must be stressed that we hear individually from many more of the electorate between meetings and we are well aware that the loudest voice is not necessarily the most representative. I believe that, without exception, your elected representatives are committed to sharing information and will continue to do so. Written questions are answered at the beginning of meetings so you can ask a question even if you cannot attend, or prefer not to speak at the meeting. We plan an August meeting at Goose Green and will try to get out to the West as a group at some point. In the meantime, if you are in town on public meeting day we will be happy to see you, hear your views and answer your questions.

# Seabed storage for up to 2,000 tons of chain

THE wet storage of up to 2.000 tonnes of chain on the seabed at Port San Carlos was approved by Executive Council last week, pending further approval by the Governor.

The chain is used in the towing operation of the Ocean Guardian offshore oil rig. When not in use it is stored on the tug Maersk Traveller.

Director of Natural Resources John Barton said the storage of the chain on Maersk Traveller was causing difficulties when the vessel docked at FIPASS, as it prevented the tug from maintaining an even keel.

He said storage off the vessel was necessary to ensure that the tug, with its comparatively deep draught, could clear the sand bank off FIPASS.

Mr Barton said Byron McKay Port Services Limited had requested permission to store the surplus chain in Port San Carlos at a site devoid of maritime traffic; sheltered, relatively free to access and situated close to the various well sites at which the Ocean Guardian is scheduled to drill in the North Falklands Basin.

Chain was stored in this manner near Stanley during the 1998 drilling round. However,

Mr Barton said due to the increase in tourism and other maritime traffic, Byron McKay Services was keen to avoid Stanley Harbour and Port William area.

As Port San Carlos is not a designated harbour there is no relevant maritime legislation in place. The seabed is owned by FIG, who can apply conditions, and as the storage is a deposit from a vessel within territorial waters, an activity not exempted by the deposits in the sea (Exemption) Order 1995, a licence is required under the Food and Environment Protection Order.

It was agreed a licence should be granted for one year on the condition the quantity of chain is limited to 2,000 tonnes, is not laid in kelp, and any information gained by the licensees on the maritime environment is shared with Environmental Planning.

# Drunk and incapable

STANLEY man Robert Karl Kiddle was on Wednesday fined for being drunk and incapable in a public place on July 23.

Police were called to John Biscoe Road near the Kelper Store where he had fallen out of a taxi, was unable to stand and had an injury to his head.

Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis told the court he had given Mr Kiddle full credit for an early guilty plea and fined him £50 plus £85 prosecution costs.

Two driving offences were also dealt with.

Lorenzo David Green from Mount Pleasant admitted failing to comply with a no entry sign and failing to wear a seatbelt without reason. Mr Green was ordered to pay £50 for each offence and £85 prosecution costs.

Stanley man Ramon Miranda (Jnr) pleaded guilty by post to a speeding offence which took place on Philomel Street on July 17. Mr Miranda was recorded travelling at a speed of 41 mph by a reserve police officer carrying out static speed checks.

Taking an earlier offence within the past three years into account, he was ordered to pay a fine of £360 plus £85 prosecution costs.

# Poor year for Illex but Loligo and Rock cod perform well

THE Loligo and Rock cod fisher ies have performed well over the first seven months of 2010, although it is too early to predict the overall performance for the year, says Director of Natural Resources John Barton.

The first Loligo season was good and the second season has started strongly, bearing out the results of the survey which took place before fishing commenced.

Mr Barton said catches of Loligo currently stood at 38,000 tonnes for the year. Rock cod has been the other strong performer with some 50,000 tons being caught so far this year.

Falklands conservation zones used to be noted for catches of Southern Blue Whiting but these have declined over the period in which Rock cod has become the highest volume finfish catch in the

reached the point now where the management of some of the finfish fisheries are based on the conservation targets for Rock cod.

A major survey of the Rock cod resource was successfully undertaken on the Falkland Islands fishing vessel Castelo, earlier in the year.

Mr Barton added: "It has been another poor year for Illex with very low catches in Falklands

"It is also apparent that it was a poor Illex year throughout the Southwest Atlantic with low catches also reported in Argentina and on the high seas

The fishing industry has once again been co-existing with oil exploration activities. Some of the exploratory wells, although not all, have been located in deeper water away from regular fishing grounds.

"The main point of interaction between the two industries is in the use of the FIPASS port facility. Use of the port has increased significantly. The port managers have endeavoured to accommodate all requests which have required flexibility from all parties.

Vessel owners and operators have generally secured the port access required and port operations have gone smoothly so far.

Both squid fisheries (Loligo's first season, and Illex) started in late February. The second Loligo season started in mid-July.

The Loligo fishery involved 16 trawlers, most of which were registered in the Falkland Islands

Regarding the Illex fishery this year, there was significantly greater interest, with some 70 vessels, mainly Korean and Tawainese, calling to collect li-Lisa Watson/MP

Agency. His South Atlantic fishery protection experience includes the use of the 20mm Oerlikon gun. and the pursuit onboard Dorada of a fishing vessel being pursued by the Australian authorities. This was a combined

operation with Australian and South African vessels; the fishing vessel was eventually stopped near Tristan da Cunha.

Director of Natural Resources John Barton said he was looking forward to Malcolm returning, adding: "The fact that Malcolm is already familiar with the Falklands shipping scene is a honus.'

## The microphone or the notebook

I REFER to your interesting editorial in the Penguin News of July 30 in which you commented on the recent lack of pertinent questioning from those attending the monthly public meetings with councillors.

I note your comment: "Perhaps the presence of a microphone thrust under one's nose is another deterrent for some not to speak their mind.

When councillors first decided to host public meetings I made a decision, as the then Head of Falklands Radio, when reporting on a meeting, not to divulge the names of those who asked questions, let alone push a microphone into their

I adopted this approach because I felt it might encourage more people to put forward their views and, accordingly, enhance the de-

For example, when reporting on a particular topic I simply used the line: "Councillors were asked what progress had been made on... etc." I would then follow-up by saying something like: "Councillor Norma Edwards replied, say-

There was never any need to reveal the name of the person asking the question. Yes, I was once or twice mildly admonished by certain councillors for, they maintained, not being totally accurate in reporting what they had said!

This method did require several hours of work back in the studio, writing up a report for broadcast, but it usually made the next bulletin! I maintained this approach until I retired from Falklands Radio in 1999.

I have been somewhat surprised and concerned to find that in recent years FIRS reporters now take along a tape recorder and not

only are the questioners' names revealed, but also their voices are heard by the listening public.

Quite a number of people have indicated to me that they now no longer ask questions at public meetings because of the presence of microphones in the room.

While the microphone versus notebook debate will have supporters on both sides. I feel that I must also point out, what to me is another "disturbing" factor in the way that public meetings are currently conducted.

For many years the Council Chamber would attract the electorate and councillors only. However, over recent years I have noticed an increasing number of high

ranking government officials sneaking in, armed with their notebooks, and taking their seats in the back row

No doubt a report of the proceedings is sitting on a Foreign Office desk in London before you hear it broadcast on FIRS

I question the need for Deputy Governors, Chief Executives, etc. to attend these "public" meetings unless they have been specifically asked by councillors to address a particular subject.

I am aware that many Civil Servants feel inhibited by the presence of these Government/Foreign Office officials and now refrain from asking questions simply because of the "Big Brother" aspect.

Perhaps I could suggest a compromise with respect to FIRS coverage? Councillors are elected by the people so, yes, their voices should be heard, and recording their replies and responses and broadcasting later does prevent any misunderstandings, and seems like a

But why not refrain from broadcasting or even mentioning the name of the person asking the question, and accordingly their anonymity could be maintained?

Perhaps this will encourage a higher volume of questioning and a more lively debate

The programme, known as an Agent, automatically monitors and records Internet performance in the background.

Becoming a volunteer will not consume much of your usage budget. If your PC is on for 12 hours a day it will only use 27mbytes/ month. Most importantly, the Agent does not monitor what web sites you access or what you do on the Internet. Please be assured that your performance data will remain confidential and will never be divulged to 3rd parties without your permission. ## Cheap labour is being exploited

THE Penguin News issue of July 30 contained a front page article "Worried workers want employment law changes" which highlighted the issue of employment.

There is a serious issue with employment and many people do get a very bad deal, which has been highlighted in the article, but I have always believed that this problem is not just in the employment terms but the vast difference in the pay bands created by the FIG with the introduction of Hay manage-

With it came huge pay increases for the top and middle earners and, to make it worse, any pay increases were based on a percentage of the wage so the gap widens year on

To make the matter even worse, because there is no regulated pay structure for the private sector, employers have been able to exploit cheap foreign labour.

Over time this has become further abused because these innocent foreign employees are being denied their employment rights and are unable to speak out because, as the interviewees stated, they could lose their jobs

It is clear that both the local and foreign employee is being discriminated against because locals cannot afford to live on these bottom-end wages so won't apply for them, while the migrant has no option but to take whatever they

This is not the best way to be portraying to the world that this is a land of opportunity when we give people such a raw deal.

The cost of living here has quadrupled in the past year and even many in the middle bracket are complaining they can hardly afford to buy the goods and services they need.

The people right at the bottom end are working hours far greater than the regulated 40 hour week for a fraction of the pay the top earners receive; they simply cannot sustain this for much longer.

Some time ago a former councillor arguing for council pay increases suggested. I believe, that £25,000 pa was the minimum required to ensure a reasonable standard of living. Yet here we are today still seeing hard working people getting less than £9,000 a year. It is way overdue for review and it is about time we introduced equality in the pay structure. There are many talented people keeping this country functioning and they are doing it for peanuts.

## Some deprived of entitlements

HAVING read the front page of the Penguin News (July 30) Thave been aware for a number of years that some employees in the Falklands are often deprived of some entitlements by their employers.

May I also point out that a meeting took place in Gilbert House on May 9 2007 between the then elected members of council and the General Employees Union to discuss among other things the possibility of a minimum wage and for a maximum working week before overtime is paid

The chairperson at this meeting said that in their opinion there was no need for a minimum wage and that a migrant workforce was essential in any community, and that some businesses here in the Falklands would not survive without one. After this meeting there was no further discussion on the matter.

The Union would advise anyone who is about to sign a contract for employment to read through it carefully and, if he or she is not happy with conditions, to discuss with the employer the hours of work, hourly rate and, should extra hours be required. overtime rate of pay, plus leave and sick pay entitlement, prior to signing said contract and commencement of work

Doing so could prevent stress and grief should a dispute arise in the course of employment

Every employee in the Falkland Islands is protected under the Workers' Protection Ordinance, so if you want to have an input into the new ordinance, now is the time to make your views known.

Anyone who would like a copy of the present ordinance can obtain a copy by email from the Union Office (geu@horizon.co.fk). As it is over 90 pages we cannot send out paper copies.

Each year funds raised from the event, held in memory of Helen McKay, are donated to the Falkland Islands Community School music department. This year, however, the £800 raised on





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# A grand character laid to rest on his beloved Saunders Island

ANTHONY Reginald Pole-Evans, better known as Teepole, Tony or Tone, and to the family as Dad, Grandad, or Grandad Tone, died on July 18, not too far short of his 91st birthday on August 12.

Known in shooting circles as The Glorious Twelfth (the start of the grouse shooting season), it was an apt time for Tone to start life too on August 12 1919, because he loved shooting, and he was a pretty good shot in his day.

He was a good horseman too, and a good farmer, stockman, gardener, sheepdog trialer, tractor driver, Rover driver, radio ham, weather man and boatman. And I say "boatman" deliberately because he was more than just a good sailor. He knew the tides and currents and could read the weather better than anyone else I know and, if necessary, could turn his hand to a bit of boat building too.

He and his sons made a craft for the movement of horses from the island to the mainland for the sports, and to move sheep or cattle to the tussock islands when necessary. They did this with the help of a couple of old Beaver floats; not a conventional boat, but it served its purpose well for years.

In fact, everything he turned his hand to he did well, and if he didn't know how to do something he taught himself. He passed this skill on to his children and, to this day, Tony Pole-Evans' children will take anything mechanical or electrical to bits and put it back together again with ease. In fact, I have heard it said that if the Pole-Evans clan fixed your Rover it was a bit like a Ferrari pit stop.

Tone, his brother Douglas and his sister Audrey spent their early childhood at Port Howard until the two boys went off to England to Preparatory School in Reading. Tony was ten at the time and three years later he went from Prep School to Christ College Boarding

School in Brecon. Wales. From Christ College he went to Aberystwyth Agricultural College at Devil's Bridge for 18 months. One of his proud claims to fame was that he played rugby for the Welsh Colts during his time in Wales. After his time at the Agricultural Col-

lege he joined the Jack Old Company in London, where he was part of a team which built a reservoir at Staines in Essex. There he was taught how to drive caterpillar tractors.

On December 13 1938 Tony returned to Port Howard and never left the Falklands again.

The following year World War II broke out and, like a lot of other young men in the Islands, Tone volunteered for the local defence force. He took his turn on the outposts, first on Weddell Island and then back at Port Howard. He and his brother Douglas also worked with the West Yorkshire Regiment deciphering messages during the West Yorks' time in the Islands.

After the war Tony went to Douglas Station to work, where he met Jessie Porter, who was working at Darwin at the time. I think he was initially attracted to her because (a) she was a very, very pretty girl and (b) she loved riding and taming colts. Not too many women could tame colts, and goodness knows he was a young Welsh colt that badly needed taming at the time. Although I don't think she ever succeeded on that front completely!

They married on November 4 1947 in the registry office which was then housed in the old barrack house on Drury Street (where his daughter Ginnie and her hus-

band now live) and they started married life at Douglas Station. Their first son William Reginald born, and they moved Saunders and had another five children in a relatively short space of time. They were a very happy family although and. Jessie was ill from

her mid thirties until her death, due to a particularly virulent strain of measles which left her a badly damaged heart, she and Tony adored one another. He loved Jake, as she was always known, and he loved his children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, Saunders, and the Falkland Islands, in that order. He was a true Falkland Islander, the salt of the earth, and he hated that the Argentines had come here and violated the Islands.

During the Falklands War, Tone hid his ham set away and continued to call two of his regular ham contacts in the UK – Les in Scotland, and Jim in Bournemouth. He called each evening at a particular time and, without using any ham radio signs, managed to transfer useful information to the MoD via these contacts, informing them about the number and movement of Argentine troops.

After the war he welcomed the troops with open arms and was very proud that the jet pilots liked to come and play in the skies over Saunders settlement. He always flew the British flag and would only take it down if there happened to be top brass visiting from the military, as a signal to the pilots not to play low-level flying games to save them getting into trouble. They enjoyed coming out for their R&R too, and Tone always made sure they had a good

time on Saunders. Tony lived on Saunders Island for 61 years, first as manager and then as co-owner with his youngest son David since 1987. It is fitting that he should be buried there on his beautiful island which he loved so much.

Approximately 60 people attended his burial on Saunders. FIGAS did a superb job managing to move a great number of those people, and Tony would have appreciated their efforts. He was a great supporter of FIGAS from its inception and our first local pilot, Ian Campbell, was a great friend.

When he first flew to Saunders and Fox Bay, Tony and Charlie Porter (his brother-in-law at Fox Bay) were both asked to observe Ian's landing and take-off and to report back on his flying abilities a far cry from all the rules and regulations that are applied today!

Tony leaves behind six children – Bill, Michael, Dylis, Gwynith, Olwen and David - and many grandchildren and great grandchildren. He will be missed of course, by all his family and his many friends. He was a true friend of the Falklands, and for all of us it is another passing of one of the real characters of these Islands.

He was full of stories, and there are lots of stories about his escapades which will be passed on from generation to generation. So for sure, he will not be forgotten. He was a kind and generous man and we are all the richer for having known him.

My one regret is that I will never know whatever it was that happened to the notorious "Lulu," about whom he used to sing (with great gusto) when he was in his cups. Unfortunately I never heard him get past the first verse. Now I'll never know what she got up to – and it's probably just as well!

God bless you Tony Pole. Rest in peace, on beautiful Saunders Island

The Falklands Health Promotion Group continues its series of columns aimed at making our lives longer, safer and healthier. This week we feature the third article on weight management...

FEELING guilty about food and eating add up to the stress in life. All foods provide some nutrition and can be included in a healthy diet – the trick is getting the balance right.

getting the balance right.

\* Eat a variety of foods as part of a healthy balanced diet. Variety adds to the enjoyment of eating, and no single food provides all the nutrition we need. Eating a balanced diet helps to provide all the nutrients needed by the body. \* Eat regular meals and always include a starchy carbohydrate food, eg bread, potatoes, rice. pasta or breakfast cereal. These will help to keep you feeling full and will provide slow release energy to last throughout the whole day. \* Eat plenty of fruit and

vegetables. Fruit and vegetables

are essential sources of vital vitamins and minerals. Aim for at least five portions every day. These can be fresh, but also frozen, juiced, canned or dried fruits or vegetables (otherwise you might want a loan from the bank with the current prices)! \* Eat the right amount to be a healthy weight. Long-term health can be affected by being either underweight or overweight. A healthy balanced food intake should form the basis of all diets, whether to maintain. lose or gain weight.

\* Don't eat too many foods that contain a lot of fat. Small amounts of fat are essential to health, but most of us eat too much, too often. Cut down on fat by eating fewer fried foods, choosing lower fat dairy foods and lean cuts of meat, and limiting cakes, biscuits, pies, pastries, crisps etc. to occa-

sional treats.

\* Don't have sugary foods and drinks too often. Limit sugary foods and drinks to meal times to reduce the risk of tooth decay. If you are watching your weight it makes sense to cut down on sugary foods and drinks as they can quickly add a lot of extra energy to your diet and slow down weight loss.

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

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

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# Now employers asked to contribute to review

# Dale's historic find

AT the age of just 13, Dale Evans has perhaps made the most significant discovery of his life - at least in archaeological terms, that is.

Dale, pictured above left with his siblings at his parents' farm at Spring Point, is a natural history enthusiast whose recent find has the world of natural history experts buzzing. The youngster unearthed bones from the now extinct Warrah, the Falklands wolf, that could lead to new information about the Islands' only native land mammal.

Museum staff and UK experts alike are thrilled with the discovery of the Evans Warrah. Read Dale's story on page 9.

EVERY known employer in the Falklands – from the largest to those with just one worker on their books – is being canvassed by the government to help determine its policy on setting a minimum wage.

More than 150 survey forms have been sent out by the FIG Policy Unit, primarily to meet international obligations that require it to monitor employment conditions on the Islands, in order to qualify for funding and loans.

But as the debate over the introduction of a minimum wage has gathered pace – particularly since the Penguin News revealed the depths of concern among some of the country's poorest paid workers – the survey could not have been more timely.

The Policy Unit is seeking details of hourly pay, hours worked, accommodation and food benefits, and employment terms and conditions such as sick leave, pensions and maternity/paternity leave. Information is to be kept anonymous, and MPA-based employers also are included within the scope.

The survey, which employers are asked to return by the end of the month, is a vital exercise in ongoing efforts to overhaul current employment ordinance in the Falklands, which is over 20 years old, and was based upon UK legislation from the early 1980s.

Senior Economist Michael Poole has since the end of last year been working with Economic Advisor Sonny Jose on potential changes, since the newly elected Legislative Assembly signalled it wanted a review.

Mr Poole said the intention was to review all employment law over the next year or so: "The original focus was minimum wage, and the part-time, casual, temporary workers and their rights," he said.

"Even those two issues of minimum wage and temporary employment become a bit much to look at in one go, so by the end of this year we're hoping to have the minimum wage done. Then we'll look at temporary employees next year, and then health and safety."

But he emphasised the setting of a minimum wage was on its own an extremely complex issue: "You don't want to introduce something so low that it impacts nobody, and you don't want to introduce something so high it ends up putting businesses out of business.

"There's no intention to try and put businesses under undue pressure. We need to try and work together towards a number that works for everyone that ensures there's no exploitation."

So far the group has reviewed legislation from elsewhere in the world and formed a consultative group, chaired by Mr Jose, comprising representatives of the Chamber of Commerce, the Rural Business Association, MoD, Human Resources Department, Attorney General's Chambers, Members of Legislative Assembly and the General Employees Union.

The Policy Department hopes to submit a paper to ExCo in November, recommending a level and mechanics of how the minimum wage might work, such as exemptions for different sectors and different levels for different age groups. If approved it will be passed on to the Attorney General's Chambers.

"If members like the recommendation, approve it, and assign it high legislative priority, then it could be done relatively quickly," said Mr Poole. "But it is going to be quite a big piece of work. And it will take up a considerable amount of time."

PUTTING the eart before the horse: the perfect idiom for the concept of charging tourists to visit Gypsy Cove, I would say.

It's mortifying enough now to take visitors to Gypsy Cove. By the time they have been transported down that boneshaker of a road, it would take a braver or far less humble person than me to suggest that they should then dip into their pocket before they can wander around the nature reserve.

The landing fee for each tourist into Stanley is £18, included in their cruise fee. We've have had more than 50,000 cruise tourists in the past two seasons, so we are talking just short of £1 million each year. And then there are harbour dues on top of that, also collected by the government. But how much has been invested back into the tourist industry?

It would appear on the face of it to be very little.

Of course, a long tender ride, because we don't have a deep water port, the arrival at makeshift pontoons alongside a decaying jetty, two tiny shelters on the seafront and about four public toilets in the entire town must make visitors feel so welcome and cared for that they are not going to worry about coughing up a few more quid to visit Gypsy Cove... after they have had their wisdom teeth shaken out on the way there, that is.

Alaska have just been through a year-long lawsuit where cruise lines claimed pasenger tax was not being spent on projects with adequate ties to the cruise industry. The case was dismissed last month. But could we afford such an action, or even stand up under

such scrutiny?

Tunderstand that the Gypsy Cove area needs to be maintained and even improved, but pray God, don't make a laughing stock out of these Islands by introducing a charge before the road is of a standard drivers don't feel they have to apologise for their government's inadequacies along the entire length.

## And another thing...

THE presentation and subsequent discussion on the Economic Development Strategy (EDS) held on Tuesday was food for thought, but the idea of a population of 9,000 by 2034 sent a shiver down my spine. A fun survey I conducted while travelling in America last year left me in no doubt that town populations exceeding 5,000 have less sense of community. Do we really need to keep growing and growing? Is there not a point that can be reached where we can maintain our own enviable lifestyle, not merely imitate others? I know which I would prefer.

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# Growth needed for action plan

A HEALTHY future for the Falklands rests not only on a healthy economy, but a healthy growth in population, the government Policy Unit's Economic Advisor, Sonny Jose, told a public meeting this week.

Falklands demography was the basis for much of the presentation on the Economic Development Strategy at the Town Hall on Tuesday.

Mr Jose took the small audience through his presentation with a mass of figures that hammered home the need for growth in the population if the current standard of living was going to be maintained or improved upon.

While emphasising that the crux of the EDS was to achieve economic diversification beyond the traditional mainstays of fishing, agriculture and tourism, he said demographics – factors which determine the size and structure of the population – would account for "pretty much two thirds" of potential economic growth.

And, he said, if population and immigration issues were not properly addressed, the labour force would shrink, the proportion of retirees would rise, and per capita income could drop by as much one third.

"Without economic growth, the economy stalls, people get poorer and the Islands become less attractive to live in," he said.

"We have all seen how Camp has transformed. If we don't watch out, Camp could be pretty much a microcosm and bellwether of the future Falklands economy."

The Falklands at present supports a population of approximately 3,000, only about 1,800 of which comprise the labour force.

But, as the population ages, a greater number of workers will be required to maintain overall standards of living through financing services such as health.

In recent decades the country's population has risen from less than 2,000 to almost 3,000. But the growth rate is declining and, on existing trends, the economy will effectively stagnate.

Mr Jose said in order to maintain a viable economy, the population would need to grow by as much as 6,000 over the next 25 years, particularly if certain challenges, such as more investment from the private sector, were not successfully met.

He said it should be made clear that the references to population growth were to illustrate a point.

Economic growth may, however, be achieved through other factors such as capital investment, productivity gains and new industry revenues.

Once the consultation period is complete an annual action plan is to be produced based on the key areas agreed in the strategy.

# Union hopes to play role in FIG reviews

THE General Employees Union in the Falklands is perhaps at its lowest ebb for years – but concern over employment law reforms may give it the fillip it needs to once again become a strong employees' advocate.

In its heyday in the 1970s and 1980s, nine in ten members of the workforce were members of the GEU, according to chairman Donald Betts.

"But we lost a lot of members when Camp went into privately owned sheep farms," he said. "It started in the early 1980s and we probably lost around 90 per cent of our membership. Then, in the late 1990s, hourly paid workers in the government sector went onto salaries and conditions were upgraded. That's when a lot of our members didn't feel the need to be in the union any more.

"At one point we used to negotiate between FIC workers and the government, but we have not had that influence for a long time."

The union, which charges an annual membership fee of £25, remains active.

"If any member has a grievance at work we try to sort it out between the employee and the employer," Mr Betts told the Penguin News.

"We do still deal with industrial disputes as much as we can. We follow the Workers Protection Ordinance and the Government Management Code, which defines the employment regulations and sets out dispute procedures.

"We have two disputes under way at the moment, but we could get four in a month or go six months without any."

He also said the union could play an important part in the Retail Price Index review, another government process currently underway.

"With the review of the cost of living coming up I would urge people to fill in the form so we get a good, broad return," he said. "I hope the union can play a role in that process. The last review was in 1989 and there have been a lot of changes since then."

Mr Betts said the GEU had received membership inquiries since vice chairman Gavin Short last week urged all employees in the Falklands to join, as debate continued over government efforts to establish a minimum wage.

But with existing members only numbering several dozen, he was eager to repeat his colleague's plea: "The main reasons for someone to consider joining are wages, and their general wellbeing as an employee," he said. "We also have access to legal representation because we are affiliated to the TUC in the UK. We have a vast amount of legal advice if we wish to call on it

"There is a place for the union, but without people's support it cannot have the power. We need them to join to make the union strong."

# Court news

A TRIAL date of August 26 has been set after Stanley woman Samantha Laura McCormick (18) entered a not guilty plea to a charge of wasting police time. The trial is expected to last one day. Two drink driving offences were also dealt with in the Senior Magistrate's Court on Wednesday. Mark Malcolm Jackson (33) of Stanley was disqualified from driving for 18 months and fined £500 plus £85 prosecution costs for an offence which took place on John Street on August 2. Stanley man Paul Theodore Stevens (44) was banned from driving for three years and fined £750 plus £85 prosecution costs after he admitted driving while under the influence of alcohol on July 30. Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis gave him maximum credit for an early guilty plea, but also took into consideration a previous similar offence in

## LAN profits

LAN Airlines second-quarter net profit jumped to US\$60.6 million in line with market expectations, from US\$4.2 million a year earlier, the Chilean flagship carrier announced this week. Continued improvements in LAN's passenger business, including its flights to and from the Falklands, and particularly its cargo business were responsible for its robust earnings, a company spokesperson said.

## Farewell Donny

STANDARD Chartered Bank Chief Executive Officer Rino Donosepoetro, better known as Donny, will be leaving his current post on Saturday, after three years. His permanent successor has yet to be appointed and Deputy CEO Barbara Keenleyside will step up as Acting Chief Executive Officer in the interim period.

## Apology

IN last week's front page article "Workers urged to join union to fight for rights," it was stated that FIC General Manager Roger Spink distributed documents to all of his employees outlining their terms and conditions. They were in fact distributed only to a very small number of their workforce who had not already received them. The error is regretted.

# **Employment nuts and bolts according to Stanley bosses**

WHILE the government has just embarked on a survey of employers across the Falklands, the Penguin News can this week reveal what retail and hospitality employers say they are paying their staff...

FULL-TIME employees at the Seafish Chandlery work a basic 40-hour week, with time-and-a-half paid on overtime, and double time for Sundays and public holidays.

They earn a minimum of 20 days holiday per year, public holiday and sick leave are subject to certain conditions being met, and maternity leave is awarded. Rates of pay increase after the first three months probationary period and six month training periods.

Wages are reviewed annually, taking into account performance, cost of living and cost of employment. Part-time employees work evenings or weekends, apart from one person who works half-days.

Saddle Direct grants sick, holiday pay and maternity leave. Staff are expected to work 40 hours a week and they are allowed to accumulate days off, within reason, take them within reason and work flexi-time within reason.

They rarely employ casual staff, but would do so at £7.50 an hour if needed.

Lifestyles gives all staff salary conditions, which vary from £8.56 to £22.63 per hour. Some part-time staff earn £8 per hour. They conduct annual pay reviews, grant full-time staff sick pay, holiday pay, and parental leave, and they contribute into a private pension plan. Hours of work vary from 38.75-39.65 per week.

No overtime is paid, but staff get preferential rates on goods purchased for themselves, and a responsibility allowance to staff when required. Casual and parttime staff do not receive any other benefits, and work a maximum of 100 hours a month.

The Victory Bar pays its staff £5 an hour, with a commission based on the amount they sell on a busy night.

Depending on the hours they work, staff are given free food. Their staff are mostly part-time, and don't have contracts, sick pay or holiday pay

or holiday pay.

Stanley Growers and Nurseries pays staff on a 40-hour week averaged over a year, with fewer hours worked in winter, and more in the summer. A slightly higher rate can be achieved according to skills and experience.

They pay overtime, which is expected in the summer season. Sick pay is approximately two thirds of the base rate after six months, and holiday pay was "bought out" by mutual agreement a number of years ago, resulting in an increase in basic rates. Reason-

able time off is allowed, with those who come from overseas often taking 3-4 months leave in the off-season, before being recruited again in the summer.

Maternity pay is not paid, but employee requests for time off are granted, with flexible part-time hours offered after pregnancy to suit parental needs.

They provide other benefits such as accommodation, meals and return flights home.

The Woodbine Cafe pays its full-time staff £6 an hour, with a working week of 37 hours, three weeks holiday pay a year, and no sick pay or maternity leave.

Sodexho, one of the largest employers in the Falkland Islands, declined to offer details of staff pay and conditions.

Contract Service Manager Niall Monaghan said he could not discuss the issue due to the terms of his contract with the MoD.

Another retail outlet, remaining anonymous, pays its full-time staff £5 per hour during probationary periods, rising to £5.35-£6 per hour.

They work from 32.5-45 hours a week, with holiday pay varying on length of service and sick pay on production of a sick note. Their part-time staff are paid £5 an hour, which can increase after yearly appraisals. They work 18-32.5 hours a week and receive holiday pay on a pro-rata basis.



# New tourist charge bid for Gypsy Cove

A BID to charge a fee to tourists visiting Gypsy Cove area was approved in principle at the recent Environmental Committee meeting.

Councillor Emma Edwards, chairing the meeting, said in her discussions with people involved in the tourist industry, £3 was considered too high a fee and committee members agreed the amount should be decided by the body set up to look after Gypsy Cove.

The Environmental Planning Officer is to prepare a report for the August meeting of ExCo.

Cllr Edwards said the fee would help pay for wardens in the area as well as improvements to shelter and seating. She said she would like to see the money go into a trust rather than the government coffers so that it would be used to upgrade and improve the immediate area for the benefit of residents as well as tourists.

The Environmental Committee agreed that residents and military personnel, as well as those belonging to SAMA82 and other veteran groups relating to the Falklands should not have to pay any fee that might be imposed.

The road to Gypsy Cove, however, would not be included in the improvements as that was an issue for government, said Cllr Edwards.

# Brazilian students to produce Islands doco

# The weather: absolutely nothing to get excited about

AFTER months of apparently abnormal weather, July figures released by the Met Office at MPA reveal the past few weeks in the Falklands have been very much... well, average, actually.

Temperature

The mean maximum temperature was 4.6 Celsius compared with an average for July of 4.4C. The highest temperature was 9.6C on the 16th and the lowest maximum was -1.6 Celsius on the 31st. The mean minimum temperature was 0.2C, compared with the 0.1C average. The lowest minimum was -5C on the 31st and the highest minimum was 5.5C on the 19th.

The total rainfall for the month was 48.5mm, against an average of 50.2mm, and much less than last year's July total of 159.8mm. The wettest day was the 7th with a total of 17.6mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 18 days and 1mm or more fell on seven days.

Sunshine
There were 65.2 hours of sunshine, compared with the monthly average of 65.8 hours. The highest daily total was 7.3 hours on the 21st.

Snow/Hail/Thunder/Fog
There were 13 days when sleet
or snow fell and five days with
hail, which is average for both.
There were four days with fog
and none with thunder.

Wind/Gales

The monthly mean wind speed was 13.4 knots, slightly below the 14 knots average. The highest hourly mean speed of 45 knots was on the 19th July and the highest recorded gust of 60 knots was also on the 19th. Gales occurred on four days and there were 12 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots.

SANTIAGO has just shivered though its coldest July since 1908, with an average temperature of just 6 Celsius, two degrees below the monthly average. A record frost was accompanied by seven days of below zero temperatures, damaging crops such as avocados, oranges and lemons.

The exports of these fruits are expected to fall by as much as 40 per cent. The entire winter has been unusually cold in the Chilean capital, with one in three people in the city reporting respiratory illnesses in the past few weeks.

Let's also have some scrutiny of the extortionate rentals charged by some property owners. Some even charge many hundreds a month just so the tenants can "keep the house" for the couple of months they are away on holiday.

undertake a review of the basket so that it reflects the actual cost of living in the Falklands, a process that will take at least a year to complete.

The current rumour seems to indicate that a minimum wage could be set as early as November this year, but what would it be based on?

Will the RPI be considered and, if there is a magic formula, what will it be? Do the councillors plan to pluck a number out of the air based on their own costs of living, or what they think people should be earning?

# Who will work on the inquiry?

THE inquiry into Stanley Dairy is the first to be put forward by the Legislative Assembly to the recently formed Public Accounts Committee chaired by local businessman Stuart Wallace.

Other members are Sharon Halford and Emma Edwards from the Legislative Assembly, David Lang and Mike Forrest.

For the purpose of the Dairy Inquiry, however, Mr Forrest and Mr Lang stood down having made declarations of interest.

Mr Forrest is the Chamber of Commerce representative on the FIDC Board and Mr Lang's daughter was the financial controller of the corporation.

At the May 31 meeting of the PAC. Mr Forrest asked for it to be minuted that he disagreed with the statement that he had "known and strong views in favour of closing the dairy."

Mr Forrest said he had never made any public statement of such views and it inferred that he had an inbuilt prejudice against the project which was not true, nor substantiated by the FIDB minutes which recorded no such view.

He said he had not attended the October 2008 meeting when the decision to close the dairy was made and had expressed views regarding the financial management and accounting of the project early in 2008.

Mr Forrest said it was important in relation to the PAC to bear in mind it was made up of volunteers and was a public service for no financial reward. He said the committee could be giving the impression that any member of the pubic who may have expressed any views on public matters would risk exclusion from significant inquiries.

# Seeking details on Stanley Dairy

THE Public Accounts Committee (PAC) is looking for any factual information from Islanders with regard to Stanley Dairy, as members set out on their first inquiry, as well as seeking expressions of interest to carry out research work and collate evi-

dence. The committee met on Thursday afternoon to consider the way forward on the Stanley Dairy inquiry, as requested by the Legislative Assembly soon after their election in November 2009.

The terms of reference as agreed by Executive Council in February read: "Given the policy to provide fresh milk to Stanley, determine whether value for money had been achieved by the time the project was closed."

"If value for money was not achieved, identify what factors led to poor value for money and how these could be prevented in future such projects."

Offering some background to the dairy and its subsequent closure, PAC chairman Stuart Wallace said there were indica-

tions the project had cost the taxpayer more than three quarters of a million pounds over a number of years. He said the work would be complex and would require an understanding of what had happened throughout the project, from the

time Stanley Dairy was purchased by the Development Corporation.

He said the committee did not have the resources to collate the written evidence needed before a useful report could be put before the Legislative Assembly and suggested the supporting work be put out to tender locally and further afield.

In addition, a notice inviting anyone in the Falklands who had anything factual they would like to contribute regarding the dairy is to be published.

Mr Wallace said he would also write to the government, the Development Corporation and Falkland Landholdings to give advance warning that information and assistance would be required.

# How final days led to court

THE Development Corporation purchased Stanley Dairy from Mr and Mrs Malcolm Ashworth in 2002.

A management agreement was then set up between FIDC and Falklands Landholdings which ended in 2006. Kevin and Leone Reynolds were recruited by FIDC in 2006 to manage and operate the business

FIDC made the decision to cease support for the business in October 2008, having concluded that it was not viable and that the business plan forwarded by the Reynolds contained too many risks.

By then more than £650,000 is reported to have been spent on the diary's modernisation. The Reynolds family left the Islands in January 2009 to return to Australia.

In early February workers undertaking a clean-up operation at Stanley Dairy discovered dead pigs and other animal remains in buildings at the site. However, as the Reynolds were out of Falklands jurisdiction, they were not questioned by the RFIP on the matter.

In April 2009 they appeared in court in Western Australia charged with importing stolen goods. The charges had arisen from a report by FIDC to Falklands Police that items to the value of £38,000 may have been stolen from the dairy. The case was ongoing at the time of going to print with the Reynolds due to appear in the Fremantle court in Western Australia again today.

## Disciplinary hearings not excessive

CONCERN from members of the public that the amount of outstanding disciplinary inquiries within the civil service had reached unacceptable numbers have been allayed by Assembly Member Dick Sawle.

At the last meeting of the Legislative Assembly, Cllr Sawle said there had been eight investigations in 2008, 13 in 2009 and five this year to date, with two complete and three ongoing.

Investigations have covered allegations of bullying, misconduct and lack of capability, and have been instigated either under the Disciplinary and Capability Procedure or the Whistle Blowing Procedure, contained within Chapter 4 of the Management Code.

Clfr Sawle told the Penguin News that while the numbers varied from year to year, on average less than one per cent of government employees underwent any disciplinary inquiry.

He emphasised Assembly Members were not allowed to become involved in individual cases and therefore he could not comment on any specific cases.

He said on average an inquiry was wrapped up within two months and added: "It would be stressful for anyone to be investigated under the Management Code and it shouldn't be drawn out."

Cllr Sawle told the Legislative Assembly that there were plans to decentralise certain functions and devolve them back down to the director/managerial level.

He said that under the Review of Government it was the intention to delegate more managerial control to supervisors and managers.

In order to achieve this, the Senior Personnel Officer would be conducting a full review of the Management Code Chapter 4, Conduct Capability and Discipline. A full programme of consultation within FIG would take place to take on board comments and to build in managerial accountability at lower levels.

Cllr Sawle said the review process had already begun and was planned to finish in June 2011.

# Chile campaigns to bring cruise ships back to its ports

THE business community in Punta Arenas has begun a campaign to ensure the cruise industry does not abandon the city, and is asking authorities for a radical change in the costs policy, which seems one of the main causes for the current decline in passenger forecast.

The reaction followed the announcement that this season the number of cruise passengers arriving in Punta Arenas is forecast

to drop 33%, from 60,000 last season to 40,000 in 2010/2011.

"The problem has been detected and we need to review costs. We need political will and a pro-active attitude from all the sectors involved," said Catalina Jaksic, president of Autro Chile, a regional organisation to promote business and development.

Although port fees are the same as those in Ushuaia, Punta Arenas' biggest competitor, the cost of

pilots, tugs, signalling and other services which cruise vessels must pay while sailing along the Chilean fjords, is higher.

However, the president of the Channel Pilots Association denied that they were responsible for the high costs but admitted that facilities were better in Ushuaia.

"The issue is of concern for the city and the country. That is why Valparaiso is leading a campaign to find ways to bring back the big

vessels," said Mauricio Silva, the regional representative for Chile's Ministry of Economy. He said the first move would be to invite all sides involved: members of congress, development agencies, the navy, Tourism Office, Foreign Affairs and mayors of the cities that were suffering the impact.

"Once we get the ball rolling and everybody involved I'm sure we will begin to see practical results," said Mr Silva. MP/PN

# Ensuring Islanders are heard in Whitehall's corridors of power

How would you describe your role as the Falkland Islands Representative in the UK?

My main role is to represent the Falkland Islands Government's interest in the United Kingdom, ensuring that the policies and views of the government are known and understood by HMG. Parliament, the media and the public.

Briefing parliamentarians on current issues, arranging MPs visits to the Islands and organising our attendance at party conferences form an important part of my job here.

### What is an APPG and what is its purpose?

An All Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) is made up of parliamentarians from all parties, in both the House of Commons and the House of Lords, who have an interest in a particular country, sector or issue.

Although a parliamentary group is not part of the government and is not involved in the legislative process, they are an important means of gaining support on issues and influencing Parliament

All groups must be officially registered with the Office of the Parliamentary Commissioner for Standards. Regular meetings must be held throughout the year and officers are appointed at the AGM

There are 145 APPGs devoted to countries – of which the Falkland Islands is one – and over 450 others devoted to a whole range of specific subjects or issues; from topical debate, such as the death penalty and youth crime – to medical issues, the armed forces, the arts, sports and even food and drink sectors, such as the APPG for cheese. And there is even one for beer!

# How long has the Falkland Islands group been in existence and who sits on it?

Our group was formed in 1981. The first chairman was Sir Michael Shersby MP (Con) and he served as chairman until his death in 1997 when he was succeeded by Sir Nicholas Winterton MP (Con), who retired at the General Election this year.

So, we have been very fortunate to have long standing chairmen (just two in 29 years). This has given the group both stability and real "clout."

As well as our chairman standing down at the last election, we lost three of the five previous officers who also retired. A former vice-chairman, Lindsay Hoyle MP (Lab), has been elected as the

Deputy Speaker of the House and therefore, while he can remain as a member of the group, he can no longer be an officer of the group.

At the meeting to reconvene the group held on July 6, the following officers were elected:

\* Chairman: Derek Twigg MP (Lab), a former Minister for Veterans at the MoD, who visited the Islands with the SAMA Pilgrimage in 2007.

\* Vice-Chairmen: Lord (Nigel) Jones (LibDem) who visited the Islands in 2008, David Crausby MP (Lab) who visited the Islands in 1999, and Ian Liddell-Grainger MP (Con).

\* Treasurer: Madeleine Moon MP (Lab) who visited the Islands in 2009

\* Secretary: Andrew Rosindell MP (Con) was re-elected to that position, he visited the Islands in 2005.

We were very pleased to attract several new Members of Parliament to the group and look forward to working with them.

# How often does the group meet and what are its principal activities?

The group meets at least three times a year and discusses a variety of topical and ongoing issues related to the Falkland Islands.

We also take the opportunity to fix up meetings when MLAs are in London, so that the members can hear first-hand the issues from the elected politicians from the Islands.

We are fortunate that our group is very active and vocal in its support of Islanders and can raise key issues in both Houses of Parliament

Naturally, it is very keen to be kept abreast of news regarding the oil exploration programme and the current situation with Argentina. While most of the Overseas Territories have their own group, there is also an Overseas Territories APPG which looks at common issues affecting all of the OTs; obviously our group also "feeds" into that group.

The newly elected chairman is Andrew Rosindell MP. The groups for the OTs, and the Commonwealth countries, come under the auspices of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association.

### In what ways do the Islands benefit from this group?

Unlike UK residents, whose views are represented in Parliament by his or her constituency MP. Falkland Islanders, like all other Overseas Territories residents, have no direct Parliamentary representation

So the APPG is particularly important to the Islands in enabling our views to be communicated to MPs and Peers and, through them, to the Government and political parties.

It is very important for the Falklands that we have All Party (or "cross party") support.

# Does the Group have any influence of government policy towards the Islands?

To a degree, yes. Group members can, and do represent the Islands in relevant Parliamentary debates.

So, having our voice heard in both Chambers is enormously important although, thankfully, the policy of successive UK Governments towards the Islands has been consistently supportive, and there is no reason to believe that this will not continue in the future.

It is important, particularly for new MPs (of which there are over 200 in this Parliament) and Peers, that our voice should continue to be heard.

# Numerous MPs have visited the Islands, and no doubt there will be a few more given the new government, but what benefit does the Falklands gain from their visits?

FIG has been running all-party visits to the Islands since 1989, and they prove to be an excellent and most effective way to ensure long-term support and interest from MPs.

A number of MPs who have visited, even some time ago, still speak about their time there and remain interested in the Islands.

Like all other organisations and individuals who represent us, it is important that MPs visit the Islands to gain first hand experience

and hear Islanders' views in person. MPs always tell me that they find these visits enormously helpful.

Interestingly, 13 members of the new government (Cabinet and Ministers) have already visited the Islands.

We are currently planning the next visit and we hope to include some of the new Members of Parliament in that.

## How do you keep in touch with Members of Parliament?

Obviously, the work we do with the group plays an important part, but also by regular briefings, our Focus newsletter (which goes to all members) and, very importantly and effectively, through our presence at the Annual Party Conferences.

We have been exhibiting at the Labour and Conservative Conferences since 1988, which makes us one of the longest – if not the longest – exhibitors!

It is important for delegates to meet our elected representatives and, indeed, for the MLAs to get a feel for public opinion about the Islands from the delegates.

Having attended both these events since the beginning, I can personally vouch for how important this exposure is for the Islands. We also attend the Liberal Democratic Party Conference for their International Day.

These events enable us to meet a large cross-section of people, not just the Members of Parliament but their constituents, the media, international visitors and many other delegates that these events attract.

It is a very effective way of getting our messages across to a very wide audience.

# You recently completed 20 years in your post as Falklands Representative in the UK. Can you describe your most satisfying achievement during this period?

I would have to say seeing the continuation and growth of the Falklands "lobby" in Parliament, which was effectively started by the Falkland Islands Association, built on by my three predecessors, and which I have continued.

We have tremendous support in Parliament but we cannot "rest on our laurels."

There are hundreds of other organisations competing for the attention and time of MPs, as well as their own constituency issues.

We cannot take their support for granted and remain extremely grateful for the time that they do

# 3 year-old

A natural history enthusiast since he was just three, now aged 13, Dale Evans has made a remarkable and significant scientific discovery

In January while home at Spring Point Farm, he found parts of a Warrah - the Falklands wolf – a species that has been extinct for more than 130 years.

The Islands' only land mammal and its origin is something of an enigma. Only six complete specimens are known to exist and all these were collected in the 1800s. Dale tells his story...

1 KNEW if there was a jawbone there must be more so I went back the next day

I knew where it was but didn't

know how to get there, so Niall showed me the way.

It was boggy so I scanned the area from the bank and thought if I looked on the surface I'd see more - the bones were black against the white sand. By the time Niall caught up I had seen a bit of the skull sticking out of the ground.

As I went towards it I saw the teeth and the cranium. I walked up to it and gently put my hands underneath the sand and lifted it

The ground was relatively soft with a crust. I took it to the bank where I examined it. By then I was really excited.

Niall was there with me and later he found a bit of hard palate (of a second specimen) and the back of a skull and I found the other bit of it, which I gave to him because they belonged together. I went back to the site a few times and stopped Shaun pulling donuts on his bike on the pond, because if it really was a warrah I didn't want any disturbance of the site.

By the skull I found another bit of jaw, and that is close to where I found a baby tooth.

I came back to Stanley after the holidays and showed Miss Edwards some pictures on my memory stick. She jumped out of her chair and said bloody hell or something like that, and told me to bring it in after lunch. She said she thought it could be really old.

Nan picked me up from Stanley House and took us up to Steve Massam's (taxidermist at the museum). Steve got really excited because it was obviously of some age. He compared it to photos of a warrah skull he had seen in Holland.

I left it with Steve for analysing, and afterwards Nan stored it in the bottom of her wardrobe.

At that time only about five of us knew about it, so that was quite exciting

Then I kept going back continuously in the holidays (Easter and half term) and found loads more bones - warrah bones and potential prey species - fish bones, squid beaks, penguin and goose bones and small bird bones

All the specimens I'd collected stayed at the bottom of Nan's wardrobe for a while. Eventually Steve and I went to the vet's to eliminate it from being a dog - I missed my maths lesson, he he! The vet didn't think it was a dog so it went back into Nan's wardrobe again.

We needed to get a proper identification without the specimen getting lost. But then I heard Steve was going to England and there was an opportunity to get the specimen identified safely.

It took ages to do the paperwork, with Leona's help. Eventually the specimen was packed up safely, to journey north with Steve and Sylv.

The waiting was perilous! Nanwas checking her email every day to see if there was any news. Then one day she came skipping down the drive at Stanley House with a nine foot grin across her face with an email from Steve.

Nan wasted a cartridge of ink because it said 'WELL DONE DALE' in huge letters.

Then it was matter of waiting for Steve and Sylv to come back to hear all the details. It's one of the most exciting things that's happened in my life - so far ..

I can't wait for the school holidays so I can recover some more artefacts from the site.

# What will happen next?

MUSEUM Curator Leona Roberts is very excited about the discovery and is now looking forward to taking the project a step further. Might these mineralised bones from the Evans Warrah provide some new information?

There is no doubt that this is a scientific find of some magnitude," said Leona, "This is the only known Warrah specimen that seems to have been a natural fatality, rather than having been collected by naturalists. The bones and the site might well shed new light on what we know about these fascinating animals.'

The Museum's taxidermist, Steve Massam, who has long encouraged Dale's interest in natural history, has been very involved with the identification process. Steve believes that this might be a den site and that the other animal bones found are likely to be species upon which the Warrah fed.

Since being told of the discovery of the bones, the Museum has been seeking advice and guidance from contacts at British museums and organisations and the next step will be to try and establish the age of these specimens, probably through AMS radiocarbon dating. If the bones are as old as they appear to be, that can only add to the importance of the find.

The next course of action will be decided with the Evans family, but might involve archaeological work at the site.

However, the Museum is going to need assistance to progress the investigation properly and is appealing to local companies for their support.

This is a unique opportunity for an individual or organisation to become a part of this remarkable story," said Leona.

The Museum is holding an exhibition of the dicoveries to date as well as lots of interesting information about the Warrah.





#### FISHING COMPANIES ASSOCIATION

The Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association (FIFCA) provides services to the Falklands seafood industry. Established under the Fisheries law it works on behalf of all owners of quota allocated under the Falkland's world leading system of individual transferable quotas.

Through information, consultation and input into government decision making the Association assists the growth of the industry. The work of FIFCA is underpinned by a commitment to the sustainable development of the Falkland's marine resources.

The Associations role includes representing owners interests and views nationally and internationally, working with Government to achieve mutually beneficial, rights based, sustainable results, promoting and funding industry related research and providing support and co-ordination services to the industry.

FIFCA is entirely funded by its members, no subsidy is involved. Funding is by a dual system of levy, a core administrative amount funded equally by all members, with individual projects being funded by members in proportion to their quota ownership.

#### THE BEST CHOICE, QUALITY AND VALUE



The Falklands Health Promotion Group continues its series of columns aimed at making our lives longer, safer and healthier. This week we feature the final article on weight management...

THE first step in successful weight management is food shopping:

\* Try not to shop on an empty stomach. You will be tempted to buy more than you intend.

\* Prepare a shopping list (with meal ideas in mind) and stick to it! Stay away from the aisles with foods you want to avoid.

\* Look out for products which carry a healthy eating logo.

\* Avoid buying more food than you need at any time. If you don't buy it. you can't eat it! \* If buying a ready meal, look for one that is lower in fat and buy extra vegetables or salad to serve with it to make a balanced meal. And remember not to fall for any of the well established myths about weight loss.

Myth: Fad diets work Fact: These diets are not suitable for long-term, permanent weight

loss. You might lose weight initially but it is often difficult to maintain weight loss and normally you put it back straight away. A realistic target of 1-2lbs weight loss a week is healthy and sustainable. Some fad diets are even bad for you as you are restricted from some food groups essential in nutrients.

\* Myth: Dining out is impossi-

ble while trying to lose weight. Fact: Don't be afraid to ask how the food is to be cooked and what the side orders/sauces are. Try to eat something before you go out like a piece of fruit or yoghurt to lessen your appetite (and your bill). Aim for two courses or two starters only, or share a starter with a friend.
\* Myth: Herbal weight loss

products are safe. Fact: They are not necessarily

safe and are not usually scientifically tested to prove that they work or are safe to take with other medication.

\* Myth: Skipping meals is a good way to lose weight. Fact: We should aim for at least three meals a day - very importantly breakfast! Eating regularly will speed up metabolism and you will be less likely to crave for food throughout the day. If you do snack make it a healthy one!

Q I FULLY agree that young men should be punished for having underage sex. However, why is nothing ever done to punish the young girls involved in these cases? Often the girls say they consent to a sexual act so therefore it is not rape. However, the men/boys are getting punished and the girls aren't.

The following answer was provided by Crown Counsel Elliott Taylforth:

ATHE Falkland Islands has adopted an age of consent as per the UK, namely 16 years. This means that it is illegal for anyone to have sex with someone below that age. Age of consent does differ throughout the world, and indeed the age can appear arbitrary. but the purpose of an age of consent is to protect the child from exploitation by adults. Sixteen is considered to be an appropriate age for a child to have the maturity to deal with the issues and complications of sexual relationships

It is not correct to say if there is consent to sexual intercourse it cannot be an offence. The law states that a child under 13 cannot consent. As such, intercourse with a child under 13 must be rape. Any sexual offence involving a complainant under the age of 13 is an offence of strict liability; that is to say an offence to which there is no defence. Consent is not an issue. Furthermore, it is an offence to have sex with a child between 13 and 15, regardless of consent. This would not be rape, and the penalty is not as high, but it is nevertheless a criminal offence.

Regarding the question "Why is nothing ever done to punish the girls?" the answer is that the law does not provide for this because the main purpose of the particular law is to protect children, not to punish them.

Someone under 16 does not commit an offence by having sex with someone over 16. This might seem slightly anomalous, because if two under 16s had sex, they would both be committing an offence in relation to each other, but that is because it may be appropriate, for example, to prosecute a mature 15-year-old who is exploiting someone younger or more vulnerable than themselves.

Each case must be taken on its own merits. Two 15-year-olds who have sex with each other just weeks before their 16th birthdays are much less likely to be prosecuted than a 25-year-old man who has sex with a 15-year-old girl. If it was a female over the age of consent, involved in sexual behaviour with a male under 16, then the female would be the one liable to be prosecuted.

It is not appropriate to comment on individual cases. There are sentencing guidelines provided for these offences, but each case will be considered on its merits, taking into account all the relevant circumstances.

HOW many people are currently in FIG accommodation, excluding contract workers?

Answers to this, and the next three questions were provided

by Housing Officer Dawn Hoy:

As at June 2 2010 there were 103 local tenancies. There are also three local house-sitters in contract properties.

Q AT present, how many people have locally applied for FIG Housing?

A S at June 2 2010 there were 57 applicants, including two of the three house-sitters, and applications for transfers to larger/smaller properties.

Q OF the people who have applied for housing, how many are single people on a wage that could pay full rent on an appropriate property?

A THE application form does not specifically ask for marital sta-

Q HOW often is the housing list updated and reviewed, and are applicants informed of any change of their position on the

A THE onus is on the applicant to keep the Housing Office informed of any changes to their circumstances post application.

Applicants are only advised of changes on their position on the list when they advise a change of circumstance. We do not advise all applicants of a change in position as the result of another application or accommodating a person above them. However, whenever a local property becomes available we tend to contact the next three people on the list that require the size property that we have available, to update their circumstances and ensure that the property is allocated to the most deserving applicant.

Q OF those people already renting government properties, how many pay reduced rent or receive "help" from Social Services? How many people are in full-time work? How many are in part-time work? Are any unemployed?

Director of Corporate Resources Keith Padgett provided the following answer:

A THERE are currently 39 tenancies that receive some element of rent rebate. However, we can't give the breakdown requested of people in full-time work, parttime work or unemployed. Most tenancies are joint tenancies and it is unlikely both parties will be in the same employment category.

**Q** THE Trough is not licensed for the sale of alcoholic drinks. The owners also advertise that only "18+" persons are to be admitted inside the premises and that all have to BYO (bring your own). What are the laws covering the consumption of alcohol by persons in this type of building? Are under-18's legally allowed and permitted to consume alcohol on the premises? If not, are under-18s removed from the premises if they gain entrance and their presence is made known to the organisers? The following answer was provided by Senior Crown Counsel Alison Inalis:

A THE Licensing Ordinance governs the sale of alcohol. No licence is required by the organisers of a "BYOB" function at which no alcohol is on sale and the public are invited to supply their own alcoholic or non-alcoholic drinks.

As no licence is required, there is nothing in law preventing children or young people attending the function. It is up to the organisers of the function to decide whether to allow under-18s to attend.

The Control of Drinking by Juveniles Ordinance is also relevant. It is unlawful for any person under 18 to be in possession of alcohol in a public place, or to consume alcohol in a public place.

It is also unlawful to supply any person under 18 with alcohol in a public place. "Public place" for this purpose means anywhere except a house and garden, and licensed premises such as a pub or restaurant. This means that if a child or young person attending a "BYOB" function is in possession of or consumes alcohol, they commit an offence. If they are supplied with alcohol at the function by any person (including another person under 18), the supplier commits an offence. No offence is committed by the organisers of the function unless they supply alcohol to the child or young person.

The organisers are entitled to require any troublemakers to leave the function; this includes any child or young person who has or consumes alcohol, and any adult who is suspected of supplying alcohol to under-18s.

Q IS it true that Spanish taught in the Infant and Junior School does not follow the British national curriculum? If so, what are the reasons for not following the national curriculum? Head teacher Nick Barrett pro-

vided the following response:

A A PILOT Spanish course has been taught to Years 5 and 6 at IJS since last September.

In this we have been ahead of England where modern foreign language (MfL) in primary schools does not come into being until September 2010.

Most English schools have opted to introduce the language progressively from Year 3 upwards. For obvious reasons we have chosen Spanish and, in the light of limited funds, to restrict Spanish teaching to Years 5 and 6.

We did explore using the FICS Spanish Department but when this proved not to be possible we contracted FILO as our teachers, as they have experience of teaching Spanish in the Islands and of course they are native Spanish speakers. The National Framework clearly states that, where possible, native speakers should be used.

We are not constrained to use the UK guidance, but feel that every opportunity to expose children to a MfL should be exploited.

The framework is very flexible, encouraging MfL teachers to customise the course for the pupils in their school.

In line with UK guidance our course is based on a great deal of oral and aural work as well as some written work.

Children are divided by experience and ability in Spanish. Obviously we have native pupil speakers of Spanish as well as absolute beginners.

Following an evaluation of the course this year we will decide whether to continue with the pilot next year. Any plans to expand teaching down the school is dependent upon further funding.

Q WILL town and Camp eventually receive all BFBS channels or will all of us receive only four channels from BFBS?

The following answer was provided by Andrew Lee of the Secretariat:

A THE actual service being provided by FIG is for four channels only. These are: BFBS1. BFBS2 (evenings and weekends only), Children's TV (early morning two-hour block of programmes, to be extended in the near future to a full day of children's programmes when broadcasting rights have been 100 per cent secured), and Sky News. Stanley and Camp all receive exactly the same.

I understand that some people have been able to receive all BFBS channels that are broadcast to the British Forces at MPA. This was due to an error in the initial set up of the viewing cards and has now been corrected.

There are currently no plans for town and Camp to receive all channels received by the British Forces. Any such plans would need to consider funding, broadcasting rights and local competition issues.

# Oil flights set to take off to the Falklands

HEAD of Logistics for AGR Group in the Falklands, Gary Black has confirmed that there is to be a fortnightly flight from the UK to the Falklands starting on September 4 to deal with the needs of the oil industry.

Hot on the heels of this week's announcement that Rockhopper's Ernest well is dry, this latest news suggests an increased level of commitment to the drilling operation taking place in Falklands waters.

During the last drilling round in 1998, oil workers were ferried between the Falklands and the United Kingdom using a Boeing 747initially, and in the latter stages of the operation, a Laker Airways VC10

Then, available seats were on occasion offered to locals working within the industry and there is speculation that seats may again become available.

The aircraft to be used this time is believed to be an A310 Airbus with approximately 194 seats, 18 of which are business class.

Mr Black said details had yet to be finalised and more information would be available next week.

# Smoking ban bid to go to public consultation

ASSEMBLY members yesterday voted to take the controversial debate on smoking in public places to public consultation.

Five years ago, during the early days of the previous Legislative Assembly, a proposed ban gathered pace, as councillors took the debate to Executive Council.

However, it was stymied by more pressing legislation, and has sat on the backburner since.

This week, though, publicans have voiced their anger at the antismoking lobby, accusing supporters of a ban of curtailing their rights to run their businesses as they see fit.

And two pub managers – Chris Sim of Deano's Bar and Kevin Thomas of the Stanley Arms – have vented their concern in a letter to Assembly Members, urging them not to introduce legislation which they descibe as "extreme."

Mr Thomas said because two Stanley pubs and all the restaurants were non-smoking, he felt the move specifically targeted their businesses. He argued: "The antismoking lobby is strong but is made up mostly of individuals who frequent our pubs only extremely infrequently. They are lobbying for a measure which impacts on other people rather than themselves.

"We are extremely concerned that a new law prohibiting smoking in our pubs will seriously harm our businesses, certainly will reduce our income and quite possibly put us out of business."

The debate gathered pace at this week's public meeting, but current Assembly Members appear divided over the issue.

Cllr Roger Edwards said he supported the ban: "If we're going to ban smoking inside, why don't we ban tobacco products from the Falklands?"

Cllr Glenn Ross said he didn't believe in a ban, and waited to be convinced that it was necessary, saying pub landlords should be able to choose, an opinion shared by Cllrs Sharon Halford and Emma Edwards. Cllr Ross said: "As you stand outside you make an adult choice as to whether you go in to that venue or not. It always worries me that these crusades to get things banned, the people involved

with them, are not then satisfied by whatever they've achieved. It worries me that they then move on to something I do like, perhaps chocolate, or smiling."

Cllr Jan Cheek said one of the arguments in favour of the ban was to protect staff working in smoky areas: "Some people don't actually have a choice about where they work," she said, arguing more people would visit pubs if a ban was introduced.

A majority of publicans and restaurant managers approached by the Penguin News backed the right for business owners to choose whether or not to introduce a ban. Rose Bar owner Robert "Rag" Maeaskill said he disliked smoking and was in favour of a ban in principle, but objected to being told what he could and could not do within a building he owned.

"We could have had a no smoking area a long time ago if we had known the ban was going to take so long," he said.

He also questioned whether if a ban was implemented there would be any compensation or subsidy for landlords if a loss of income was shown as a result of the legislation. "That's what happened in the Camp," he added.

Tanzi Jacobsen of the Victory Bar said her family business was an extension to the family home and owners should not be told what they could and couldn't do within it.

Don Pick, landlord of the Globe Tavern, agreed: "Pubs struggle financially already. It will do more harm than good," he said.

Managers of two venues which have already banned smoking, Falklands Brasserie and the Malvina House Hotel, said their businesses had improved.

"It made the ambience so much cleaner and better for the clients, and it made our working conditions so much better," said Alex Olmeda. Carl Stroud said: "People always say it's nice going to a bar that's smoke free, especially visitors to the Islands. Most people who come from abroad find it odd when they come to a bar and it's full of smoke."

THE smoking ban in public places debate has now well and truly begun. At this week's public meeting, I fought - and lost - against the incredible urge to speak out in support of what I believed in. I am a smoker, on average I would guess about 20 a day, and I want smoking to be banned in public places. Controversial, I know.

I was living in the UK when they introduced the smoking ban, and I hated it. Yet within two weeks I had quit completely, which was to

last 18 months, until my return to the Falklands.

I can assure you I am not the exception. A large number of my acquaintances wish they had that helping hand to kick the habit. One in particular quits most Sundays, to find himself with drink and fag in hand come the following Friday.

The view pubs should be left to choose a smoking ban is ridiculous. Why would they do something so potentially detrimental by choice? And is it so inevitable they would lose money? There are a substantial number who would socialise more in a smoke-free venue.

The rationale for smoke-free laws is that smoking is optional, but breathing is not. To protect our non-smokers, pub staff, and indeed the younger members of the community who (it has been proven) are less likely to become lifelong smokers if they socialise in a nonsmoking environment, something has to be done. Second-hand smoke carries (along with the smell, and occasional burn to clothing and skin) an increased risk of heart disease, cancer, emphysema, and many other diseases: it can kill.

More than most things, I enjoy dancing in Deano's on the weekend. Other than returning to my living room on an evening to avoid the smoke, I don't see any other viable options, even for a quiet drink. Has anyone considered that we're discriminating against the non-smokers by forcing them either to breathe in someone else's

toxins, or remain home alone?

I am asking you, our elected members, to put aside your habitual preferences, man-up to the arguments that may come, and make a decision that is best for the younger generation: a decision for the future, for the youth. And, while you're there, come up with something that will protect our landlords.

# Willie awarded Queen's honour

Willie Bowles

SURROUNDED by family, friends and fellow former prisoners of war, Willie Bowles accepted the first Queen's Certificate and Badge of Honour to be awarded in the Falkland Islands at Government House on Tuesday evening.

The Queen's Certificate and accompanying Badge of Honour is a new local honour to allow the Falkland Islands Government to recognise those who have, by their loyalty and meritorious conduct, provided services of exceptional benefit to the people of the

Falklands. The award was announced on August 14, Falkland Day, which commemorates the first recorded sighting of the Falklands in 1593

Governor Alan Huckle said Mr Bowles was honoured for his services on behalf of those interned by Argentine forces at Goose Green in

May 1982, and also for his encouragement of young people interested in woodworking and

carpentry.

More than 40 supported his nomination, and it was a measure of the deep affection and esteem with which Mr Bowles was held that so many had attended the function, said Governor Huckle.

One fellow detained in the Goose Green club described Mr Bowles as "quiet and unassuming" and told of how he was often called upon to translate in some quite difficult situations, but he "never failed to deliver to us from these meetings anything but hope and encouragement."

A former councillor in the 1970s, Mr Bowles can now be spotted on a daily basis controlling the school time traffic and

exchanging high fives with Infant and Junior School children as he ensures they safely cross the road.

Admitting he was never a fan of publicity, he said the award had been a well kept secret which he knew nothing about until the Governor informed him.


I certainly never expected it and it gave me a bit of a jolt," he told the Penguin News. "It was a big surprise. There was a fantastic turnout and it must be the first time so many prisoners of war have gathered at Government House," he said. Governor Huckle

said honours were not now awarded just for a job well done, because that was what salaries were for. Mr Bowles had shown continued commitment to the community, he said, particularly through encouraging young people to take up woodwork and carpentry

Steve and Kate Burston have also been awarded the Queen's Certificate and Badge of Honour for their services in running the Shack youth club for the under 15s, and a presentation will be held at a later date when they return to the

There will normally be three awards made each year which will



# Dry dock fire adds to Falklands ferry woes

THE return to the Falklands of the cross-Sound ferry vessel Concordia Bay has this week been further delayed after a fire at its dry dock in Montevideo.

It will not now be able to resume services until at least the end of the month, and will not be available for passengers travelling to and from the Hill Cove two nighter next weekend.

Eight crew were evacuated from the vessel late on Sunday night after fire broke out on the Korean fishing vessel In Sung 2, berthed alongside the Falklands ferry.

Speaking to the Penguin News from Montevideo, Workboat Services manager Adam Cockwell said at one stage it appeared the Concordia Bay might be at high risk.


He was alerted to the fire at 9.30pm while staying at a nearby hotel with George Betts and Raymond Poole: "We had just finished supper and the master of the ship rang me and said the ship next door was on fire and they had to consider evacuating.

"We got there ten minutes later, by which time the fire on the Korean vessel was going very well, and the crew of the Concordia Bay was mustered on the dock."

"The risk to the Concordia Bay seemed quite high. They had gas and oxygen cylinders on the Korean ship. The fire appeared to be quite significant and we assessed there was a high risk the gas bottles could ignite.

"At about 10pm we were instructed to leave the dock and went back to the yard entrance."


"We then got back in touch with the Falklands and had next of kin informed so that everyone knew everyone from the Concordia bay was OK."

known how many crew were on board the Korean vessel, but it was understood there were no injuries.

The crew of the Concordia Bay was moved to a hotel that night, and Mr Cockwell returned to the yard at 7.30am the next morning.

He said there was a small amount of smoke still issuing from In Sung 2, and water was still being pumped into it, but he was allowed back onto the Concordia Bay and confirmed there was no damage. The crew returned to the vessel about an hour later and continued work as normal.

Sunday's drama, though, has only served to add to frustrations for Workboat Services, owners and operators of the Concordia Bay. Having been unable to carry out its annual maintenance programmes in Punta Arenas because of the Argentine imposed shipping restrictions, the Concordia Bay reluctantly sailed for Montevideo.

On arrival from the Falklands it was delayed by a day going into dry dock, and endured further delays because of the In Sung 2, even before the fire. "It was always known coming here we

could be delayed by matters out of our control," said Mr Cockwell.

"We came into Montevideo on July 28, but we have been considerably delayed by the Korean vessel carrying out a large amount of work, and we can't go back into the water until this work has finished.

"Our work on the dock has finished, but we are now at the mercy of the In Sung 2."

He said he hoped to see the Concordia Bay back in the water tomorrow (Saturday), with sailing tentatively set for Monday or Tuesday, and arrival in the Falklands the following week.

"We would hope to be back within a week, by the following Monday or Tuesday, but it is entirely dependent on the weather," said Mr Cockwell.

"It's incredibly frustrating for us. We are entirely at the mercy of others

"We couldn't go to Punta Arenas, so we had to come here. We can entirely understand how people feel, but there is nothing we can do to get the vessel home any faster."

# Tourist fee debated

THE proposed fee for tourists visiting Gypsy Cove prompted more debate at Tuesday's public meeting in the Town Hall.

Gary Clement said he agreed with the Penguin News editorial comment of August 13, and added: "Sometimes you take them down there and there's only one pen-

Councillor Emma Edwards, though, said it was necessary to find something to recoup the cost of the wardens – about £40,000-£60,000 a year – and for upkeep of the area such as improving and providing benches, shelters and better toilets. She said locals, military, SAMA veterans and possi-

bly land-based tourists would not be charged, and that it would only be during tourist ship visits when extra people were necessary.

"One of the things I really want to do is ensure that the costs stay sensible, she said. "Even £3 we feel is too much, and we're looking really at costs of between £1 and £2, but that's not really down to us to decide."

A trust will be set up to make the final decision, she said, and will be responsible for paying for wardens, upkeep and improvements to the area. Cllr Jan Cheek said: "Otherwise the taxpayer is subsidising the tourist, which is not the point."

### Youth sentence

A YOUTH was yesterday sentenced to seven months detention, suspended for two years, after admitting four motoring offences, including drink driving and taking a vehicle without consent. Four other offences were consideredincluding criminal damage and taking a vehicle without consent as he was in breach of a suspended sentence imposed earlier this year. Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis ordered him to pay £85 costs and £2,000 compensation. He was disqualified him from driving for 12 months and handed a supervision order for two years.

## Nestor by a neck

ARGENTINE president Cristina Kirchner has a better image, but her husband Nestor Kirchner will finally be the incumbent presidential candidate in 2011, according to a public opinion poll undertaken by Poliarquía for Buenos Aires daily La Nación. Ms Kirchner communicated better and was more intelligent, said respondents, but Nestor represented power and authority.

### Chile Googled

CHILE is set to become the first South American country to have buildings in some of its cities rendered in 3-D through Google Earth. The popular mapping program shows satellite images of the earth's surface, including cities and towns, in varying degrees of resolution.

### Blasted bugs

FOUR hundred householders have completed questionnaires for the Bug Busters group, dedicated to tackling the Islands' earwig menace. Cllr Glenn Ross said there didn't appear to be a "hot spot" in Stanley, but that the pests were everywhere.

#### Lan merger

CHILE'S Lan airlines is to merge with Brazil's Tam to become the region's biggest carrier. The combined airline – Latam Airlines Group – will fly to 115 destinations in 23 countries, with a 40,000-strong workforce. Both airlines will retain existing livery.

THE Falkland Islands Government has appointed Edelman to provide public relations and media support for the next three years. Edelman succeeds Keene PR in September.


# Emily takes to the sea to find vital minerals

IF you have spotted people wading around in the sub-zero temperatures of Stanley harbour over the past week or so, don't worry: it's not some new fad that is highly unlikely to take off, it's part of an experiment that may help sheep farmers reduce the cost of mineral supplements lacking in Falklands grazing.

Emily Hancox, as a part of her studies in Environmental Biology at the University of Lancaster, has been experimenting with feeding kelp to sheep as a way of ensuring they have all the right minerals to remain healthy.

In the Port Stephens and Fox Bay areas on West Falklands there is a cobalt deficiency which has a severe impact on animals' ability to grow and, Emily says, there is evidence that kelp contains the right levels to correct this, if she can get the sheep to eat it.

However, like many humans reluctant to eat health food, the kelp doesn't seem to appeal to the sheep in its natural form, and may need to be made into pellets before they can be encouraged to eat it. Kelp also contains other minerals such as copper, saline nitrogen and phosphorous, all necessary for the healthy growth and finish-



WITH a limited budget for road repairs the Transport Advisory Committee was reminded on Tuesday, that the current policy was to remove cattle grids where possible and realign fences so that they were not needed, to free up funds for much needed surface works.

Committee member Ted Jones said he had plans to remove one cattle grid on his land within his current fencing programme and there were more that could be removed in other areas.

£100,000 has been allocated for the replacement and installation of cattle grids in the forthcoming season, with tender documents for the works to be published in the near future.

This includes four replacements in the Fox Bay area, installations on the road to Johnsons Harbour and south and west of Port Howard, as the capping operation progresses.

Assembly Member Sharon Halford said there was a further programme planned for next year, to install grids in some of the 28 places on East Falkland which still have gates.

ing of sheep to abattoir standards. Her studies to date have been with Macrocystis Pyrifera, also known as giant kelp, and what Emily describes as "the big bubbly stuff."

Emily says there is evidence that the minerals in kelp are sufficient to replace that with which farmers supplement their animals, but time and resources have not allowed her to complete her studies during this holiday, and she intends to continue with her feeding and weighing trial when she returns next year.

She looks forward to hearing from anyone who can help out, particularly with establishing exactly what types of kelp sheep are already eating around the shorelines.

Emily said she would like to thank all the farmers who had been so forthcoming with information, as well as the Development Corporation for its assistance throughout the trial, and her friends who took the plunge to help her collect kelp. Emily can be reached at e.hancox@lanes.ac.uk.

# Fighting G returns for one last hurrah

HMS Gloucester this morning set sail from Portsmouth on its seven month patrol of the South Atlantic. The Type 42 destroyer, which last year spearheaded maritime security in the region, will spend the majority of her deployment patrolling the Falklands and South Georgia

She will also make official visits to various South American countries including Brazil and Chile, and will represent the UK at an exhibition of defence technology. Commanding Officer, Commander David George, said: "Gloucester will be providing British citizens in the South Atlantic with the reassurance of knowing

that the Royal Navy is looking out for their interests.

"But while we are down there, we are also policing the seas and ensuring that they are safe for all to use and pass through."

The Gloucester is known as the Fighting G, a reputation earned in part for being the only warship in the world to have shot down an incoming enemy missile in anger, when one of her Sea Darts struck an Iraqi Seersucker during the Gulf War of 1991.

She takes over patrols from the frigate HMS Portland for what is likely to be an emotional tour: it is expected to be her final deployment after 28 years of service.

# Drawing inspiration from Chile's ugly past

CHILEAN Artist Carlos Zuniga left the Falklands on Saturday after a ten day visit. While in the Islands he gathered material and produced artwork for his upcoming exhibition in London, in November.

The 36-year-old has worked as a professional artist since 2005, and previously studied architecture, design and art at the Universidad de Chile.

Carlos bases his artwork on three main concepts: the disapperance of Chilean nationals during Augusto Pinochet's military dicatatorship between 1973 and 1990, Charles Darwin's Theory of Evolution, and the economic system. He uses headshots of anonymous people, transferring the images onto phone book pages.

Thousands of names on the phone book pages are erased or blackened out to create the images, portraying the disapperance of people during the dictatorship.

After seeing a document belonging to the US CIA concerning the strike in Chile during Pinochet's regime, Carlos saw a possibility to create meaningful artwork expressing the problem

which affected Chile and its population, mainly in the 1970s.

As Charles Darwin's Theory of Evolution is one of the main concepts behind his art, Carlos decided to visit the Falklands to work with the landscape and follow in Darwin's footsteps.

Carlos has now returned to his hometown of Santiago to process and produce his artwork in preparation for his upcoming exhibition. The exhibition, running for two months from November 24 at Edel Assanti. Vauxhall Bridge Road, London, will be his first outside Chile, although he has sold work in other locations around the world. Spread across two floors, it will feature portraits and land-scapes from both the Falklands and Chile.

Carlos said he expected his work to because universal as the problem he was portraying was a widespread, global issue, extending beyond the borders of Chile. He said although he was a known artist in Chile, he wanted to be known throughout the world.

During his time in the Falkland Islands he has taken a variety of different photographs that he will consider including in his exhibition, although the production stage of the work will be completed in Santiago.

These include headshots of locals and landscapes from the air.

He told the Penguin News how much he had enjoyed his time in the Falklands and that he had been welcomed by many locals around Stanley

# Rockhopper site comes a cropper

THE latest hole to be drilled by Rockhopper Exploration is dry, the Guardian reported on Wednesday.

The Ernest prospect reached its target depth of 2,240 metres with no hydrocarbons found, in contrast to the the excitement in May when the Sea Lion prospect was declared an oil discovery with an estimated 242 million recoverable barrels.

Shares in Rockhopper fell three per cent, with Desire Petroleum falling by six per cent, and Argos Resources by four.

Rockhopper managing director Sam Moody said: "The result of Ernest is disappointing, but the well was always designed to investigate an entirely different geological play type from Sea Lion."

Reuters, though, quoted analyst Richard Rose of Oriel Securities, who remained positive: "Our buy recommendation remains unchanged. Ernest was always seen as high risk and the investment case in Rockhopper remains focused on Sea Lion and the prospectivity elsewhere on the eastern margin of the basin."

# Airstrip extension approval granted

THE Poncet family on Beaver Island has had extension plans for their airstrip approved and can now finally look forward to developing the businesses they operate from there.

Beaver is currently occupied for eight months of the year, but has the potential to return to year-round occupation with an air service reinstated.

The island supports a reindeer and sheep farming enterprise and is the main base for a longestablished, successful yacht charter business.

"With the return of an air service, development of tourism activities would also be viable," said Sally Poncet.

She said that socially it had been particularly difficult for her sons Dion and Lief.

"You can't just invite someone out for the weekend. That's the biggest thing, the social closing of doors."

During Farmers Week, Sally publicly thanked Assembly Members for their help and support in getting things moving: "It's taken two long years, but we are getting there now," she said. Councillor Jan Cheek said members had been encouraged by the amount of self-help offered by the Poncet family with the earthworks.

New Island airstrip would be the next easiest to get back into operation, said Cllr Roger Edwards, adding that he hoped the New Island Trust also would go some way to assist with associated labour and costs, as the Beaver residents had.

He said there were also funds in the budget to carry out survey works on West Point Island.

Rural Business Association Chairman Raymond Evans emphasised the importance of airstrips on the more remote islands: "There are quite a lot of young people living on the islands now and it's important that they are able to get off easily," he said.

The Standing Finance Committee recently agreed to approve Executive Council's decision to fund the cost of supply and transport of materials and plant to Beaver Island for the extension of the runway.

The amount totalled £38,600, with £8,300 found from funds remaining in the Camp airstrip inspection budget.

# Unhealthy for our businesses

IAM writing to express my growing concern about the anti-smoking legislation under consideration.

In the first case this initiative seems targeted specifically at our businesses, as pub landlords, as there are few other, if any businesses that would be affected by such a law.

I operate my busines responsibly; my customers, the majority of whom are smokers, are all adults. Our businesses are all onerated by the proprietors, there is a choice of smoking and no smoking venues at which people may gather. Two of the pubs in Stanley, and all of the restaurants are nonsmoking. The anti-smoking lobby is strong but is made up mostly of individuals who frequent our pubs only extremely infrequently. They are lobbying for a measure which impacts on other people rather than themselves.

I, and other landlords in Stanley, are extremely concerned that a new law prohibiting smoking in our pubs will seriously harm our businesses, certainly will reduce our income and quite possibly put us out of business.

Many of our regular customers will simply not come to the pubs if they cannot enjoy a ciga-

rette when they do.

We do not think it reasonable that they introduce an extreme law which takes no account of the fact that the Falklands are not UK, that the way of life here is different, the customer base tiny and the weather makes it virtually impossible to enjoy a smoke outside, unlike the much warmer and less windy weather of the UK.

We very much hope that if antismoking legislation is introduced it will not be over the top and will take account of our concerns.

# Pay takes a turn for the worse

Last week's letters page article by Tim Miller. "Freebies mask the real wages." sounded a bit like the old colonial days when people lived in tied houses.

I question what he means by freebies, because if he means all the benefits in kind, and I assume this is the case, then maybe he would care to explain the principle of some contract officer receiv-

ing an all-expenses paid salary. Surely these are also freebies masking the real wage of those individuals already earning five to six times that of the people at the bottom, who he is obviously referring to.

It was noticed that no actual admittance of hourly rates was offered from that establishment.

Yes, Mr Miller, like other employers, is looking for the cheapest means of employing personnel, and who wouldn't, but the issue here is not how much the employee gets in so-called freebies, but the actual take-home pay that individuals need to put food on the table and pay his or her service needs.

He and other employers offer their workers accommodation and flights as part of the employment terms.

It should be pointed out that this would only apply to imported labour because many people locally either still live at home or are already renting property.

No one seems to be looking at the real issues here. No matter what the perks offered are in any employment, the facts are that both the lowest and highest paid employee pays exactly the same price for their everyday needs: food, electricity, fuel, services, rent, etc. But they are receiving massively different wages.

There is also an urgent need to regulate the basic essential goods pricing structure.

Just in the past week we have seen old stock Chilean UHT milk jump up to £1.09 in some stores yet there have been no supplies due to the embargo. This is clearly profiteering by the business owners yet they expect their staff to happily pay these extortionate price hikes and say nothing.

To suggest that these low paid employees with all their benefits in kind are doing OK would be better clarified by suggesting that the middle and higher paid people try to live on these lower paid incomes for a year

I bet their lifestyle would change somewhat, and so would their views.

The Cost of Living Index is a joke: it is antiquated and does need overhauling. This alone will not solve the problem, though.

The only sensible way to do that is introduce equality in the pay structure, something I have been saying for many years.

It is ridiculous to think that someone earning less than 20 per cent of a top earner's pay will be largely compensated in the benefits in kind they receive.

Government employees were recently awarded one per cent to-wards cost of living increases, but it is just a token of what should be awarded.

Just take a dozen hen eggs and a single orange as an example; they increased by almost 100 per cent.

So you can see that people who were already at a disadvantage are now many times worse off.

Finally, the most likely concern of the employer in any minimum basic wage is that if they have to pay a bit more actual cash they will also likely be further taxed by way of current levies, because it is based on a percentage of employ-

ment income, whereas benefits in kind are not value added tax to the employer.

I just hope that the process does not take years to resolve as there are a lot of people out there right now struggling to meet their basic cost of living - and it is getting worse not better.

Cambridge was three days of stunningly incongruous talent. I just loved it. There was one scary moment when I was cornered by a troop of morris dancers, but I escaped into a marquee selling beautifully crafted musical instruments.

But there was a happy, if expensive, outcome: I bought (another) guitar and a teach yourself mandolin book. Now I just need a mandolin.

At the Stanley Folk Club all those years ago, I could not have imagined blogging comments and photos on facebook, but that's what I did during breaks between acts at the festival. Hope you enjoyed the show, facebook chums, and thanks to all those who replied. Next year, come with me and enjoy the real thing.

# Relations should be improved

BRITISH ambassador Shan Morgan said Argentina/UK relations must go beyond the Falklands conflict, during a recent visit to Salta, a northern province in Argentina.

In an interview given to El Tribuno, Ms Morgan said the two countries had "more issues in common than the Falklands conflict: we have historic links that clearly exceed the difference over the Islands. Argentine railways were built by the British and so were many other infrastructures. My priority is to maximise coincidences beyond our differences."

When asked about the recurrent Argentine calls for sovereignty negotiations, she said it was a very important issue for Argentines. She added: "But the position of my government is well known and has not changed. I understand we have an important difference, but we also have other forms of cooperation."

The British Ambassador said claims about Argentine protectionist practices were being handled by the EU Commercial Attaché and denied that any British corporation had complained about lack of legal security in Argentina: "Labour capacity in Argentina and talent are excellent, and that is what British companies are after. Over a hundred British companies are established in Argentina and 36 of them belong in the top ranking."





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# Those magnificent men in their £75m flying machines

IT'S almost a year since the Typhoon aircraft took up the role of air defence of the Falklands, and their presence is a source of great pride with Falklands residents. The aircraft, costing in the region of £75 million each, patrol the skies and undertake valuable training on a daily basis. For the past four months Squadron Leader Steve Pook has been in charge of the aircraft which were flown to the Islands in September 2009 clocking up an historic flight for British aviation. Steve (40) has just completed his sixth and probably final tour on the Falklands, and is proud to have commanded a squadron of the world's most capable swing-role combat aircraft.

### How does flying here compare to elsewhere in the world?

The weather makes it interesting and can catch us out, as you saw in June when we were diverted to South America. But flying around here is great. There is not much traffic, no controlled air space issues to deal with, apart from the ranges and wildlife sanctuaries which have to be avoided. We get a lot more low level flying here than in UK, which is really valuable training for us. In the UK most of the flying we do is high end and fighting against other aircraft. Here the threat is of a much lower order so that is what we train for. We have some top end limits on winds we can fly in, mainly because if we eject we'll be killed, and of course cross winds for landing, but generally the wind is in the west which is OK for the runway here. The Typhoon is very agile and uses a lot of lift off the wings, but the downside to that is that it is susceptible to high winds on the runway. However, these are training limitations. Operationally if we have to go, we go.

# If you were to plan a scenic flight around the Islands where would you go?

I'd head out over Head of the Bay Brook and into San Carlos. I'd then cross the Sound onto what we call A4 Alley and fly down Coast Ridge. It's beautiful flying down there. And then for pure scenery I'd fly over Weddell Island and the Arch Islands.

#### The Top Gun movie is famous for the nicknames the American pilots had. Do British pilots have nicknames?

We do, but they are nowhere near as imaginative as the Americans who tend to get theirs when they

are passing out because of something they have done. Ours tend to be name related.

Do you give the aircraft names? Yes. Faith, Hope. Charity and Desperation, for example, and they have personalities too. Despois the sickly bird in the fleet. If any of them is going to break it will be her. She hasn't flown as much as the oth-

## When did you know you wanted to be a pilot?

I flirted with the idea briefly when I was very young, but I actually wanted to be a geologist. Then I changed my mind as I was approaching 21. My dad was with the Air Force and worked for British Airways, and he said they were crying out for pilots so I thought I would give it a go. I passed their

aptitude test and they passed it on to the RAF. I joined the RAF to fly helicopters, but it was at a time when we were reducing in size and it was fast jet or bust. If you didn't make fast jet you weren't going to be a pilot. Thank goodness for that, because I have had an amazing

time.

The specific thing is capacity the ability to deal with a lot of different bits of information while still carrying out the task. In my job the flying is very much secondary. To be honest, anyone could fly a Typhoon, it's a doddle. The problem comes when you have to start fighting and there's a lot of information thrown at you to deal with; multi-tasking. Confidence is important too. It was when I became confident in my decision making I realised I was probably going to be OK as a fast jet pilot. I had a lot of trouble during basics because I struggled to make a decision. My instructor told me to just make a decision. It didn't matter if it was the right or wrong one because you can always correct it. Just get into the habit of making a decision.

#### Multi-tasking is most often attributed to women. Are there any female Typhoon pilots?

Just the one at the moment. Helen Seymour, an ex-Tornado pilot. She was here around Christmas time and is a very good pilot.

# What advice would you give to a young person who would like to become a pilot?

Go to university and get a degree. You need to be good at and practice mental arithmetic. Not just adding numbers up, but what we call mental dead reckoning. Be able to look at a map and calculate distance and time, etc. Play a lot of computer games for hand eve coordination, which should be very easy for most kids. It's a useful tool, but don't play too many as you have to work and study to get the grades too. Flight simulators are also useful because some of the aptitude tests will have you looking at similar instruments, so getting used to them is a good piece of training. But, most importantly, don't let your education suffer.

## Is the Typhoon the best in the world?

Bar the most expensive, the fifth generation American Raptor, the Typhoon, as what we call a fourth generation fighter, is the best.

#### What gives it that edge?

The Typhoon has power – it's got great engines and of course the air frame. It's highly agile unlike most of the aircraft we have had in the past. Together it means it can carry a lot of stores without degrading the performance of the aircraft. It allows us to fight in the places we want to be able to fight. High or low and fast while carrying a lot of stuff. It turns like crazy and has got loads of power. It's just brilliant.

#### What's next for you?

This is my last flying job in the RAF. I'm going back to a desk job in September until I leave the Air Force – it's my time so I am moving on. I'm on what's called the career spine and my chances of flying now are reducing. Once you get to a certain rank, flying jobs become fewer and fewer. I'm looking at more and more desk jobs and that is not what I joined the Air Force to do. I'll fly for fun but I am not going to the airlines or anything like that.

# A charming introduction to an enchanting slice of paradise

TRAVEL writer Vivien Devlin and her partner Ken visited the Falklands earlier this year on board the cruise ship Silver Spirit. Vivien has entered Bluff Cove Museum for the British Guild of Travel Writers Tourism Award under the category Best Overseas Tourism Project. The shortlist for the award is to be announced in September, and the winner in November. Vivien writes...

ON February 25, after sailing over rolling, rough seas, the Silver Spirit ship glides into Port Stanley to anchor off shore.

From the pier in Stanley harbour, 50 of us set off in a convoy of ten, hardy 4x4 Land Rovers driving several miles over barren, moonscape terrain and rough track roads, past Tumbledown battlefield and skull and crossbones warnings for roadside landmines.

Heading off the dusty road, it's then a rock and rolling trip across muddy bogs and rocky moorland to reach Bluff Cove Lagoon. This is home to over 2,000 Gentoo, Rockhopper and King Penguins as well as seasonal Magellanic nesting penguins.

Two separate groups - penguins and cruise passengers - stand huddled in the icy wind on the edge of the sandy beach, the first group protecting the young

chicks, the other snapping photographs. In the tranquil salt sea air, this is a rare, raw untouched natural world. No wonder Bluff Cove was voted one of the world's 50 best beaches (Sunday Times Magazine, May 2010).

Expat Brit, Kevin Kilmartin came to the Falklands in 1976 after backpacking around the American continent. He purchased Bluff Cove Farm, a 35,000-acre estate where he breeds Perendale sheep and Belted Galloway cattle. In 2002, realising that an increased number of cruise ships sailed into Stanley for a day visit to the island, he very wisely invented the Bluff Cove Lagoon Tour, across the other side of his farming estate to see the penguins down on the seashore.

Kevin's wife Hattie, a professional chef from the UK before settling in the Falklands, seems to be a very active and energetic brainchild in the exciting development of their Bluff Cove visitor attraction. A short stroll along the beach is the Sea Cabbage Café which opened in 2004, serving Hattie's home-baked scones and diddle dee jam, rock cod pate, smoked seatrout and BBQ lamb.

Over tea and cake, local musician Jenny and little Toby (Hattie and Kevin's son) entertain visitors with traditional tunes on the accordion. Time to browse around the recently built Bluff Cove Mu-

seum, an attractive, blue clapperboard beach hut featuring the familiar black and white Penguin book icon. The literary connection is apt. The museum is an eclectic treasure house of antiques, artefacts, travellers tales, maps, farming tools, vintage telephones and war poetry.

A fascinating display covers the visit to the Falklands by Charles Darwin who crossed Bluff Cove farmland by horseback in March 1834, during the Beagle voyage around South America.

The Falklands became a serious influence on his study of evolution. Most interesting are his political comments about friction between Argentina and Britain in the 1830s: "A bone of contention between nations."

Learn about the Adeline shipwreck in Bluff Cove and pioneering explorers. Archive maps feature local place names Darwin and Fitzroy, named after the Beagle captain, and descriptions of "mountain ranges and impassable valleys."

The 1982 Falklands War is represented with military artefacts and personal memorabilia. Nearly 30 years after the war with Argentina. many servicemen and those interested in history and battlefields are visiting the Falklands, journeys to pay tribute and in private reminiscence. Arts and crafts are also represented with wool


spinning demonstrations and a gallery to showcase local artists with exhibitions of paintings and felt work. The museum has window seats, binoculars supplied, for prime seaviews of the lagoon and the wildlife habitat along the seashore. Sealions and dolphins can be seen surfing the waves and bird lovers can look out for skuas, snowy sheathbills, geese, oyster catchers and steamer ducks.

The gathering of oral history from Islanders is a valuable, ongoing project for the Museum. The British Islanders are descended from a social and cultural mishmash of shipwrecked sailors, whalers and Scottish shepherds.

Hattie is keen to make the museum as interactive as possible, drawing on memories, genealogy and family stories, working with local historical charities around the Islands. This is not just about history but also very much a "living museum" about the lives of Islanders today.

Our visit to the Falkland Islands was one of the most memorable and enchanting highlights of the cruise

The resilience and self-sufficiency of this close-knit community (700,000 penguins, 600,000 sheep and 3.000 people) is truly enlightening. Visitors are assured of the friendliest welcome from the Islanders – sustainable, ecological tourism at its best.

The Falklands **Health Promotion Group continues** its series of columns aimed at making our lives longer, safer and healthier. This week we feature advice on pregnancy...



THE Falklands has about 30 babies born each year, varying between 19 and 50! There are many things that you can do to improve the outcome of your pregnancy. including planning for the pregnancy and making sure you are in the optimal health: so ensuring that you are the best weight for your height, you are eating a healthy diet and taking regular exercise that makes you breathless.

It is important that you are a non-smoker and there is no smoking in your household. This applies once the baby is born. Also reduce the amount of alcohol that you drink and, preferably, do not

If you are planning to become pregnant you should take folic acid supplements, even if you are healthy and have a good diet. Once pregnant, continue to take the supplements for the first 12 weeks of pregnancy.

If you take folic acid supplements it reduces the risk of having a baby born with a defect of their spinal cord such as spina bifida. It probably reduces the risk of having a baby born with a cleft lip and palate, and of premature la-

For most women the dose of folic acid is 400 micrograms (0.4mg) a day. If your risk of having a child with a spinal cord problem is increased then the dose is

higher (5mg a day - you need a prescription for this higher dose).

Pregnant women who come into close contact with sheep during lambing may risk their own health, and that of their unborn child, from infections that can occur in some ewes

These include chlamydiosis (enzootic abortion of ewes - EAE), toxoplasmosis and listeriosis. which are common causes of abortion in ewes

To avoid the possible risk of infection, pregnant women are advised that they should:

- not help to lamb or milk ewes
- avoid contact with aborted or new-born lambs or with the after-
- avoid handling clothing, boots etc which have come into contact with ewes or lambs

So try and plan for your pregnancy and be in the optimal health so you are ready to respond to your baby and family life.

## Worries over the Games security

THE Falklands has a team of 15 competing in five sports heading for the 19th Commonwealth Games in Delhi in October

While some countries have been voicing their concerns about security in Delhi and withholding decisions on whether to send a team, Chairman of the Falkland Islands Overseas Games Association (FIOGA). Mike Summers said the safety of Falklands athletes would be paramount

Mr Summers said there had been a number of newspaper articles which raised legitimate concerns about security and safety, without being very specific about the perceived dangers

The safety of Falklands athletes, however, will be paramount. as it will be for all competing nations and the Indian organisers, he told the Penguin News this week. We will seek formal advice from the UK's assessment advisors if there are real or perceived dangers," he said, adding that there were to be further security assessments undertaken as the Games grew closer.

The Commonwealth Games Federation (CGF) continues to monitor closely the work of the organising committee, and has said that it is content with the security arrangements in place.

Mr Summers said one difficulty for journalists and commentators is that, not surprisingly, nobody will tell them quite what security arrangements are in place, so they are left to speculate: "We will remain vigilant and take advice if

there is any apparent threat to be evaluated," he said.



# Sixteen civil servants on top tier pay scales

CRITICS of the controversial government restructure were quick to point to the creation of a raft of new "superheads" as an example of top-heavy management. With the changes now firmly bedded in, the Penguin News this week analyses civil service wages, from the top to the bottom...

OFFICIAL figures reveal there is a hierarchy of 16 "senior" staff within government, on salaries ranging from £59,094 to £113,202. Five of these are known to be filled by Falkland Islanders.

Top earner is Chief Executive Tim Thorogood, paid somewhere between £83,670 and £113,202. He is the only employee on the highest grade of A3.

Seven staff are graded A2, on salaries between £73,854 and £88,620


They are the Financial Secretary (formerly Director of Corporate Resources), directors of Procurement and Efficiency, Health and Education, Public Works (formerly Public Services) Natural Resources, the Attorney General, and the non-directorate post of Chief Medical Officer.

Eight others make up the remaining senior staff positions at A1 grade.

They are the directors of Community Safety and Mineral Resources, and the non-directorate posts of Principal Crown Counsel, Senior Magistrate, Head of Policy, Senior Dental Officer, Senior Veterinary Officer and Major Projects Director (now vacant).

Excluded from this list is a position of temporary Legislative Drafter (A1), due to be disestablished at the end of this financial year, and four doctors' positions (including one part-time) which are graded A/A1.

Below them are at least 15 staff on A grade, each earning between £39,846 and £59,274. A majority

of these run or manage their own department.

At the other end of the scale are the cleaners, general assistants and waiting staff (at Government House), each of whom is on the lowest grade I, earning between £10,962 and £13,536.

While some private sector bosses pay their employees as little as £5 per hour, the minimum hourly wage in government, based on the full-time equivalent of 37.5 hours per week, would appear to be at least £5.62.

Should government approve a legal minimum wage, one would expect it to not be higher than that which it already pays.

Receptionists, clerks, attendants, handypersons and drivers make up the majority on the next two pay scales of H/H2 (£12,648-

£16,734) and G/G2 (£14,346-£18,984).

The figures are broken down into such detail, it is easy to identify the pay scales of known individuals.

Records also reveal which roles were disestablished and which were created, together with those that are projected for the next financial year (2011/12).

Last year's restructure saw six senior posts axed: Government Secretary (A2), directors of Health and Social Services (A1), Education (A1), Agriculture (A1) and Human Resources (A1), along with that of Chief Police Officer

Three new directorships were created – Procurement and Efficiency (A2), Health and Education (A2) and Community Safety (A1)

- while two others were upgraded: Public Works (A1-A2) and Natural Resources (A1-A2). The Director of Finance position was rebadged Director of Corporate Resources, and then reverted to Financial Secretary, all the while staying on the A2 pay band.

The three remaining directorate heads were unchanged: Chief Executive (A3), Attorney General (A2) and Director of Mineral Resources (A1).

The total operating budget of the nine directorates within government is a little over £38 million. Health, Social Service and Education represents by far the biggest of these, with a budget of £12.3m. Public Works operates on £8.1m and Natural Resources on £5.9m. Mineral Resources has the smallest budget of £475,000.

Aside from the revenue and expenditure figures themselves, the statistics also shed light on how many employees work in each area of government, and how many carry out specific roles.

One of the biggest of these groups is qualified teachers, with 18 listed for each of Stanley's two schools.

There also is provision for a total of 17 learning support assistants across both the Infant Junior School and the Community School.

There are provisions for 30 retained casual firefighters within the Fire and Rescue Service, 14 staff nurses or senior staff nurses at the hospital, and dozens of handypersons and plant operators in Public Services alone.

The figures are taken from the FIG Approved Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for 2010/11.

# Container park costs approved

WORK has started on a container park on the area to the east of the FIPASS access road.

Executive Council recently approved the works which Assembly Member Dick Sawle described as "a proper container park together with the necessary infrastructure and electrical outlets that will allow for the storage of close to 300 containers."

He said it would be a vast improvement to SAAS's ability to operate its container service and would also provide a much needed

piece of shore-side infrastructure to service FIPASS. Standing Finance Committee agreed and approved Executive Council's decision for the development of shoreside infrastructure at FIPASS for the storage and manipulation of containers. The total estimated development costs of £944,470 are to be financed from capital programme provision (£500,000), Development Corporation provision (£200,000) and additional revenue accruing to the Public Works Department (£244,470).

# EPO empowered to issue licences to kill caranchos

THE Environmental Planning Officer has been delegated the power to issue licences to shoot Crested Caracara, known locally as carancho.

Cllr Dick Sawle said at the heart of the issue was the delegation of authority and the checks and balances needed to ensure that, while council was unanimous that such matters should not be dealt with at Executive Council, such delegation was properly managed.

It was agreed that regular reports would be made to the Environmental Committee stating not just the numbers of licences issued but also the number of birds killed. Crested Caracara are protected by

the Conservation of Wildlife and Nature Ordinance 1999.

The most common justification for granting a shooting licence to control wild birds under the current ordinance is to prevent "serious damage to livestock, foodstuffs for livestock, crops, vegetables, fruit, growing timber or for any other form of property or to fisheries."

Shooting licences are regularly issued for Turkey Vultures, occasionally for Crested Caracara and very rarely for Striated Caracara.

Delegation of powers to the Environmental Planning Officer for issuing licences to shoot Turkey Vultures was granted by Executive Council in 2005.

Thirty-two different cruise ships have confirmed their schedules, the majority of those being hardy expedition vessels carrying between 100 and 800 passengers

Carcass, West Point and Saunders islands are set to benefit most from expedition ships, with Carcass receiving 26 visits, West Point 20 and Saunders 18. They are aiming to purchase stock from UK, America and Chile, and will be introducing other services such as providing ballgowns and wedding dresses. They also aim to change their collection of clothing once every three months to keep fresh stock in the store.

The absence of a shipping link with Chile had proved problematic, he said: "At the time I did the research and business plan we still had the shipping link, but now we don't any more, it has complicated ordering stock.

The items bought by the pair will be consolidated by company Patagonia Trading and transported overland in container to Rio Grande in Brazil, before being shipped down to the Islands.

## Harrier Jump Jets to take off prematurely

THE Royal Navy's Harrier Jump Jets are to be taken out of service prematurely - leaving Britain's two newest aircraft carriers with no aircraft, according to reports.

The Harrier was the first jet in the world to be able to take off in a very short distance and land vertically without a runway

A mainstay of the Fleet Air Arm since 1960, its finest hour was during the Falklands War when the planes shot down 20 Argentine aircraft without suffering a single loss in return.

But UK defence cuts mean there will be no Harriers left in service when Britain's two new carriers - HMS Queen Elizabeth and HMS Prince of Wales - are launched in 2014 and 2016. As a result, says the Daily Mail, Britain will be forced to borrow US warplanes. It quoted a senior military source as saying: "The US Marines have the aircraft. Their aircraft would fly from the British carriers. Or we could borrow some from them

"The Treasury are happy to pay for the carriers but there's an issue over the cost of the aircraft."

The last Sea Harriers operated by the Fleet Air Arm were withdrawn from service in 2006, leaving Navy and RAF pilots using the GR9 ground attack variant of

There are 45 Harriers still flying, which are currently due to go out of service in 2018. But the Daily Mail says the aircraft could be retired as early as the end of next year.

## Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

MANY thanks to Gavin for the last two diaries.

MY two week holiday shrank to just over one, but I did fit in my old year group reunion in Shaftesbury. This was an interesting opportunity to gauge how well informed people are about the Falklands. Admittedly not a random group, as all were aware that they had been at school with Falkland Islanders (two were awarded scholarships to Dorset grammar schools annually in the 1950s and 60s). As one would expect of a well educated group, most were pretty well informed but under the impression that there had been a commercial oil find because of the overexcited international press reporting earlier in the drilling campaign. Apart from the fun of meeting, and recognising some classmates not seen for 46 years, it was a chance to assess the opportunities that the old grammar school system had given us. Although few were really happy with the boarding conditions which were both spartan and rule bound, all valued the grounding their school years had provided. I RETURNED in time to attend the presentation of the first Queen's Certificate and Badge of Honour to Willie Bowles. It was a great gathering of people genuinely delighted to see Willie receive this award.

SOME of the concerns being expressed by some employers about a minimum wage are, I believe, unfounded. First I would be very surprised if it was set at a level that damaged businesses. However, if a business cannot pay a "living wage," is that a truly viable business? Secondly, where employees receive benefits in kind, for example food and accommodation, an equitable formula can be agreed to calculate the value as part of their income. Finally, it is my honest belief that only a minority of businesses are exploiting their employees so only a minority will be affected.

New manager to solve 'acute' KEMH issues

STANDING Finance Committee has discussed and agreed with Executive Council's recommendations for the appointment of an interim Hospital Manager for the King Edward Memorial Hospital for a period of six months pending a full management restructure of the department.

Director of Health and Education David Jenkins said that since his appointment in January he had found that the overall medical management structure and procedures could be improved.

He said that while the management structure needed to be reviewed strategically for all three areas of the his remit - Health, Education and Social Services - this would potentially take more than a year to accomplish.

Mr Jenkins said there were a number of more acute management problems that needed to be addressed within the KEMH, such as areas where clinical policies, protocols and procedures needed strengthening, personnel having to "go off sick" due to work-related stress, and the lack of comprehensive business processes and risk management.

"All the KEMH staff work hard towards achieving high standards in all that they do," said Mr Jenkins.

"However, the foci of the proposed interim health management changes are to improve clinical standards, improve management practices and develop more comprehensive business and risk management practices, including financial."

A paper proposing some of these changes would be put before ExCo for consideration and, said Mr Jenkins, "hopefully approval" in September.

He said it should be noted that even if ExCo approved the restructuring in September, then it would still take some time for the proposed management changes to be implemented.

"For a variety of reasons the decision has been taken to recruit an interim Hospital Manager," he said.

"The role of the interim Hospital Manager would obviously involve some of the daily management of the hospital."

"It would also involve the capture of appropriate data from all business areas of Health, including the health budget and risk management activities."

"The Hospital Manager would have the capacity to develop the hospital services without facing the day-to-day clinical challenges that would be managed by the Chief Medical Officer.

"The post would also be attractive to the local workforce of skilled managers as there would be less need to have a health professional qualification, so could be more easily recruited locally."

# FIG investments reveal shortfall

THE Government's overall investments had performed well over the past financial year, despite a decline in the final quarter, Simon Wilkie, the Financial Services Manager told the latest meeting of Standing Finance Committee (SFC).

However, because of the difference between realised gains and losses on actual sales of investments and overall market movements, there would be a substantial shortfall against the investment budget for the year as a whole, he said.

As previously reported in the Penguin News, BP shares were less than two per cent of the value of any funds at June 30, and the Investment Managers considered that the stock was currently undervalued, and so did not recommend any sales.

HSBC, however, were still performing below benchmarks.

SFC were told that the Investment Manager replacement process was progressing with interviews scheduled for September 29. Following ongoing poor performance by HSBC, future investment management and policy has been reviewed with assistance from an independent

investment advisor. In order to improve the returns for the Falkland Islands it has been agreed that HSBC should be replaced. while the other investment adviser, Newtons, would be retained. There is now an exercise to find a better manager to replace HSBC. The largest fund manager that could be considered as a potential replacement, Blackrock, would not be included, as they had indicated that their size would preclude them from offering the level of discretionary management required by FIG.

Mr Wilkie explained that as they were geared to very large investments they tended to offer standardised products and investment management, and would not be able to meet the detailed hands-on management attention that FIG was looking for.

This left three good managers in the process, said Mr Wilkie, and following the interviews in September, the outcome would be reported to Executive Council in October, so that the replacement could proceed.

Because of the three months notice required to HSBC, the change would not be completed before February 2011.

# Oil drilling rig returns to Sea Lion

Rockhopper Exploration announced on Wednesday that it had safely plugged and abandoned the dry hole that it had drilled on the Ernest prospect in the North Falkland basin following completion of all logging runs.

The Ocean Guardian drilling rig is now preparing to proceed to Rockhopper's Sea Lion prospect where the company intends to carry out a flow test on the Sea Lion discovery well drilled in May.

This remains the most promising find so far in the current drilling round.

Submission for approval of the final design for the flow test programme was made to FIG on Tuesday. The flow test is expected to give an early indication of the production potential of the reservoir sands, and will be an essential part of the planning process required as the company moves towards its full appraisal and possible development programmes.

Analysis of the Sea Lion discovery so far has led leading independent oil consultants RPS Energy to upgrade its best estimate of recoverable contingent resources from 170m barrels to

242m barrels.

# Record exam results for the FICS A-listers

Eighty-one per cent of Year 11 students gained at least five A<sup>+</sup> to C grades, far in excess of the comparable UK figure of 69.1%.

panic from the landlords about loss of business and, although some businesses did drop slightly, they thought for a little while it wouldn't work. But it did, and those who fell were mostly the places that were hanging on by a thread anyway. Custom picked up again better than before and new places started to open. Recent pub closures in the UK are not the result of smoking bans, they are financially related.

Those hard-line smokers who said they would never go to the pub again and would rather sit and drink/smoke at home because they were not going to be dictated to—well, as it happened, it wasn't long before they dropped their stance and were back in the pubs again.

Nothing changed for them except they had to go outside for their hit, because they had made a personal decision to either continue smoking which only affected them and not everyone in their vicinity, or they quit and made a better life for all around them.

## Council clouds airstrip issue

I REFER to your article "Airstrip extension approval granted" (Penguin News August 20).

I am sure it can never be easy for a writer, pulling together comments and statements from a number of sources, not to finish up with a piece that does not have an element of ambiguity to it and which could be misleading to your readers.

With particular reference to comments by Members of the Legislative Assembly (MLAs) which infer lack of self-help from those directly concerned with the re-establishment of the New Island airstrip - although this is where ambiguity may be at fault -I hope the following puts our particular situation into the correct perspective.

The building of the New Island airstrip at the time of the introduction of Islander aircraft to the Falklands was carried out purely by self-help, with no assistance whatsoever from government.

It took a lot of hand labour, not just over weeks but many months, and it was some years before it could be used.

The strip was taken to the maximum length before it was obvious that our labour alone was no longer an option and that machinery of a size not normally available was needed for work to carry

We would of course like to offer assistance (and so have MLAs equally "encouraged by the amount of self-help offered" as in the case of Beaver Island).

However, in practice, the New Island airstrip is a much bigger job which goes beyond that.

Where we can we give help willingly: perhaps members should speak to the Morrison team who came to build the New Island jetty to youch for this fact.

Even in the current situation. we have not sat back, and every effort was made to find the means of extending the airstrip without the need to approach FIG.

Approaches were made to the military and serious consideration given to hiring the right machinery and getting training to use it; unfortunately with no success.

If one was to put in print all the practical reasons for our inability to carry on only with selfhelp, and the arguments for the importance to get all three airstrips back into operation, one would require to fill many more pages.

Perhaps members of this Assembly are unaware of the help given by the New Island Conservation Trust when a team of FIG engineers carried out feasibility work on the airstrip in the early winter of 2009.

A very considerable part of the cost of that operation was paid for by the Trust, and we did as much as we could to assist on practical issues such as surveys to locate spoil borrow pits, landing sites for machinery, etc.

Clearly council had to make a decision on which airstrip to work on first and the choice appears to be based on taking the easiest and cheapest,

Rather than mixing this with what reads as negative self-help responses from New Island, could they not simply admit that the New Island job is going to cost three times as much as Beaver Island and it will have to wait?

## a beautiful girl

MY family history research has, surprisingly, led me to the Falkland Islands, and I wondered whether any of your readers could add to the information I have already collected.

My great great grandmother Catherine Blackley (nee Welsh) migrated from Scotland to the Falklands with her husband John Blackley and his youngest son William from a previous marriage.

I do not know exactly when, but it would have been between March 1868 - when she married John at St John's Dalry, Kirkcudbrightshire - and the 1871 Scottish Census.

John, a shepherd, was I believe employed by Robert Greenshields or his agent to work on Douglas Station. There is a picture of John and Catherine (now Cate) in "Old Falkland Photographs.

The accompanying text says they lived in a small house on the San Carlos River, that they had adopted two very beautiful girls who were the subject of night visits by farmhands from Port San Carlos on stolen horses, and that Cate smoked a pipe

On the death of her husband Cate was offered free tobacco for the rest of her life by WK Cameron, owner of the nearest store. In 1881 Johns son William, described as a "gaucho from Scotland," married Fanny Smith at Darwin

William, with Fanny and their children, left for Patagonia in about 1899 to become a farm manager. but unfortunately he died there with his son James in a drowning accident in 1904.

I know John and Cate's house was called "Sierra Montevideo," because that was the address they gave in a letter consenting to the marriage of their "ward and granddaughter" Annie L McKenzie to Hector Angus McDonald at Stanley in 1896. I have no idea who the other beautiful girl was.

John died in 1901 and is buried at Port San Carlos.

Cate died in 1907 and is commemorated in the Welsh Family memorial in the St John's Dalry churchvard.

It is inscribed: "Catherine, wife John Blackley, died at Falkesland, South America, 8th June 1907 aged 78 years.

This was the clue that led my research to the Falkland Islands and, indeed, my plans for a visit early next year to pursue the research and to enjoy the heritage and wildlife of your Islands.














# Treasury pays top dollar for new notes

SUPPLIES of new £10 and £20 Falklands banknotes are to be replenished - but they come at a steep price.

There are currently 17,000 unissued £10 notes left in the Treasury vault, alongside 31,000 £20 notes, representing one and two years' supply respectively.

two years' supply respectively.
Another 200,000 notes of each denomination are to be ordered, with a revised date of January 1 2011, and bearing the signatures of the three current commissioners Keith Padgett, Moira Eccles and Linda Lyse.

The estimated cost of purchasing the notes will be £157,776 excluding freight.

Executive Council was told that in 2004 the price for 200,000 notes was £44,036 – or 22p each – from the currency printers De La Rue.

The latest figures reflect an increase of almost 60 per cent – to 39p per note – but efforts to find a less expensive quote proved unsuccessful.

ExCo was told that De La Rue had taken over most of its competitors in the currency printing field and, in a report from the commissioners of currency, only two other suppliers could be identified.

One was in Spain, which was not considered to be a politically wise choice, and one in Germany which dealt with Euro notes and, as a result, would not be interested in the small numbers required for the Falklands

De La Rue said its increase was due to the small numbers involved and that previous print runs had been carried out at a loss to the company. The cost of the notes is to be met from the Currency Fund.

Existing £20 and £10 notes were last printed in 1984 and 1986 respectively. The Treasury holds around 14 years' supply of £5 notes and many more years' supply of £50 notes.

# Police report reveals 75% detection rate

DIRECTOR of Community Safety and Chief of Police Gary Finchett joined the Royal Falkland Islands Police in January 2010 after a particularly turbulent period within the force, when confidence in the police and morale of staff had been eroded due to a number of high profile incidents and personnel issues.

He recently reported that with the support of staff at all levels of the organisation, significant improvements had been made and had rightly been acknowledged by key stakeholders including. Members of the Legislative Assembly.

"This is an exciting and dynamic time for the Royal Falkhand Islands Police as we strive to enhance public confidence in policing, respond effectively to the public when in need, prevent and investigate crime and disorder, protect vulnerable people and effectively manage serious incidents," said Mr Finchett. The RFIP annual report shows that the police

department generates revenue of £290,374, which represents 42 per cent of the total expenditure (£687.933) during 2009/10.

The main earner was road traffic licences at £267,704. Next to wages, which accounted for £488,159 of expenditure, was recruitment costs which used up £41,564 of last year's budget.

In the annual report Mr Finchett said theft, assault and criminal damage were the top three crimes reported in the past year, following the same pattern as the previous year. However, it was pleasing to note that all three crime types had reduced during 2009/10, although the number of arrests had remained constant.

Between July 1 2009 and June 30 2010, the RFIP recorded a total of 141 crimes.

Of these, 28 were the subject of current investigations and 12 had been "no crimed" - that is a crime report was initially completed, but on further investigation it was discovered that no crime had been committed.

Of the remaing 101 crimes, 76 were been detected and 25 remained undetected.

Mr Finchett said it was an impressive detection rate with three quarters of all crimes being detected, which he said could be expected to rise as investigations into the 28 current crimes come to fruition. He said that in addition conviction rates remained high, with only one acquittal recorded in the past year.

## Facts & figures from the RFIP...

THERE are currently 7,005 vehicles registered in the Falkland Islands, which equates to 2.4 vehicles per head of population. While this is an upwards trend many vehicles are no longer on the road and some may have been exported. Many old vehicles are retained off the road for spare parts rather than being reported as scrapped. However, there is no requirement for owners to notify the police of this. When the replacement police database system is introduced all registered keepers will be contacted to enable a current. more realistic licensing database to be established.

APPROXIMATELY 2,140 vehicles are taxed and used on the roads. While this is an upward trend it is not exact because some vehicles are taxed for only part of the year, vehicles on the West are not required to be taxed or registered, and some vehicles in Camp are not taxed as they are not used on public roads. Revenue generated from vehicle excise in 2009/10 was £267,704.55.

THERE are currently 4,389 Falkland Islands driving licences on record. Many of these were issued to contract officers, military personnel and other transient visitors, therefore the number of licence holders bears no relation to the number of drivers actually using the roads in the Islands. 315 new and replacement driving licences were issued in 2009/10.

DURING 2009/10 122 driving tests were conducted, of which 87 tests were passed (71%) and 35 failed (29%). In addition, 32 persons failed to attend their driving test or it was cancelled. The cost of a driving test is £26.75.

ALL telephone calls to and from the police station are recorded. Computer records show that the police received and dealt with 16,492 telephone calls in the last year, 1,115 of which were emergency 999 calls.

THE two Police Land Rover Discoveries have more than 150,000 miles on the clock and are approaching the end of their serviceable life. One is to be replaced by a Land Rover 110 LWB in 2011.

THERE are a total of 61 licensed premises in the Islands, including pubs, clubs and off licences.

# Two Maydays in three days for new SAR crew

The new Sea King Search and Rescue (SAR) crew at Mount Pleasant were just settling into its routine when the pace suddenly picked up with two Mayday calls within three days...

RESPONDING to the first call-out. Flight Lieutenant Steve Wilders and his Sea King helicopter crew headed out

some 140 miles to the south east of Stanley, to evacuate a casualty on board the fishing vessel Gambler. The Hercules C-130 was also deployed to locate the fishing vessel and provide communication links.

For co-pilot Flight Lieutenant Ian Holdom, it was not only his first deployment to the Falkland Islands, but also his first Search and Rescue operation. He said it was great to work with the Hercules crew: "It was the first time I had worked with other air assets and it was of immense comfort to us for them to be on location."

The casualty, although quite seriously injured, was stable and successfully winched and flown to the King Edward Memorial Hospital in Stanley.

Back at Mount Pleasant with kit quickly reorganised, there were rumblings that a further Mayday

call may be afoot. Two days later, on August 19, the crew were once again getting ready to set out on a SAR operation. However, said pilot Steve Wilders: "This was going to be a little trickier due to the distance and the difficult sea state."

The fishing vessel Jacqueline was a colossal haul some 200 miles directly east of Stanley.

To increase the fuel efficiency of the Sea King the crew stripped any non-essential fittings from the helicopter. Again the C-130 Hercules deployed in support of the mission and also HMS Portland was in position ready to assist if necessary.

The crew flew into an extremely strong headwind for most of the two-hour journey there.

Sergeant David Livingston said they were "once again given peace of mind on seeing the Hercules in place." He said they aimed to be at the scene for no longer than 30 minutes, and on this occasion had to perform a stretcher recovery of the casualty rather than the usual winching, which obviously added to the wind and sea obstacles already being faced.

This was David's second deployment to the Falkland Islands but his first SAR opportunities. With the casulated and this

alty on board and stable, and this time with a side wind, the Sea King returned to the King Edward Memorial Hospital before heading back to Mount Pleasant to await their next mission.

Mike Summers is part-owner of the Jacqueline, which has been operating in South Georgia since

1997, generally without mishap.
He said: "This kind of incident brings home the vulnerability and danger to crew working at such distances in testing circumstances.

"We are hugely grateful to the SAR crew for their bravery and commitment in helping others, working sometimes on the limits of endurance."

He added that the fisherman was now comfortable but remained very ill in hospital, and that without the assistance provided by the doctor at King Edward Point and the SAR crew the prognosis might have been very different.



# New truck to provide improved fire cover for Stanley Airport New truck for Stanley Airport Stanley Airport

DUE to arrive in the Islands on September 12 is a fully compliant CAA CAT 3 RIV based on a Bremach Xtreme 4x4 chassis for the Falkland Islands Fire and Rescue Service at Stanley Airport.

Stanley Airport requires CAA CAT 2 cover for Falkland Islands Government (FIGAS) Islander aircraft, with back-up from Stanley provided for helicopter cover.

Chief Fire Officer Gardner Fiddes said that once the new appliance arrived it would be sufficient to cover both the FIGAS aircraft and helicopters without back-up from Stanley.

A further refurbished vehicle to replace the current Bedford appli-

ance at the Stanley station is also in transit. Mr Fiddes said after its arrival there would be another review and safety case undertaken which would hopefully result in the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) Dash 7 aircraft resuming operations from Stanley Airport.

For the past two seasons BAS Falklands flights have used Mount Pleasant Airport because Stanley Aiport was unable to comply with new regulations set by ASSI.

Stanley Airport fire cover was the responsibility of the Fire and Rescue Department from 2002 until July this year when, following a review, it again became the responsibility of FIGAS.



# National poop scoop month

ALL dog owners in Stanley will be familiar with their six weekly routine of shuffling off to the vets for their dogs' hydatidosis treatment

The treatment is to kill off any tapeworms called Echinococcus granulosus. Dogs are the definitive hosts of this tapeworm, the animal in which the worm matures and reproduces. Worm eggs are passed out onto pasture in dog faeces and can be ingested by sheep. The eggs hatch, larvae migrate to organs in the sheeps' body and a cyst develops. Inside the cyst are many protoscolices. When a dog eats the cyst, the protoscolices attach to its intestinal lining and develop into an adult worm and the life cycle starts again.

A worm in a dog or a cyst in a sheep has very little consequence for the dog or sheep, however if a human was to accidentally ingest some worm eggs (from contact with dog faeces) and a cyst were to develop it could have serious medical consequences. It is because hydatidosis is zoonotic (ie can pass from animals to people) its eradication is desirable. This is why the current dog dosing programme and offal disposal requirements have been in place since the late seventies.

Based on examining every single sheep carcass that passes through Sand Bay Abattoir and farmers examining sheep killed on farms, the current estimated prevalence of hydatid cysts in sheep is approximately 0.008%. This is an extremely low number and we would like to tentatively declare ourselves free of hydatid disease, but we feel we need to do some final research before we can do this.

We can, however, only examine the small percentage of Falkland Island sheep that pass through the abattoir. So, we would like to look at the other part of the life cycle in dogs. A trial has been proposed and approved which will

allow us to see if there is any evidence that any dogs have recently been exposed to the *E. granulosus* worm. Theoretically all the tests should be negative, but any positives will show that there is a flaw somewhere in the eradication programme that we can then focus on

The trial involves the following timetable:

August 25 - dogs are not dosed September - Facces sample collection from every dog in the Islands throughout the month

October 6 - dose dogs as normal while the results are awaited.

All dog owners will receive faeces collecting kits and if you haven't received any by the end of August please let us know. All instructions are enclosed in the kits. We need to receive fresh faeces, so if you can't get the sample to us on the day you collect, they can be frozen until they can be sent to us.

Please remember to package your samples up appropriately if you are not returning them to us by hand. They need to be in two layers of plastic bagging (which are provided in your kits) and then in a rigid container (eg an old margarine container). Please label the package as a medical specimen and let the pilot know what it is (partly so he doesn't sit it under the heater!)

The Veterinary Service would like to take this opportunity to remind Stanley dog owners that allowing your dogs to defecate in a public area, is not only an unpleasant health risk, but it is also a legal offence. So please carry Poop Scoop bags at all times and dispose of dog mess responsibly.

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
