Bid to save restaurant which broke the mould

FALKLANDS Brasserie, one of the country's best loved eateries, is facing an uncertain future and may be forced to close its doors at the end of next month.

Proprietor Alex Olmedo this week handed letters of notice to his eight staff, telling them he could not be certain they would remain employed into the New Year.

"It is a terribly sad situation," Mr Olmedo told the Penguin News.

"I have the most wonderful and loyal staff, and it breaks my heart to tell them they may be out of work after Christmas."

The Brasserie was greeted by the community when it opened its doors in 2000, providing the first and only serious competition to the long established Malvina House Hotel.

The two restaurants have continued a long-running rivalry for custom, sometimes with staff moving between the two venues, but with Stanley diners benefiting the most from the competition.


Now, though, that may soon disappear.

At the same time as the Malvina House Hotel was installing a new kitchen and increasing its residential capacity, Mr Olmedo launched a wine and tapas bar service at the Brasserie, offering earlier opening hours and occasional live entertainment, in addition to the regular lunch and dinner service.

But while the new features proved successful after a prominent publicity campaign, the core business of the Brasserie has not increased sufficiently to cover rising costs.

Mr Olmedo said he was now considering taking the business in a new direction with perhaps a simplified menu and a new offer of services at a lower cost.

"I am really hoping my customers will rally to our support and

pack the restaurant, especially as we are approaching the party season," he said.

"That is the only way we can be sure of ongoing success. But apart from the disappointment of myself and my staff, it would be a terrible blow for Stanley to lose one of its most popular businesses.

"We may pull through but, for the sake of my staff, I have to give them the opportunity to find work elsewhere, just in case we don't."

Mr Olmedo moved to the Falklands from Santiago in 1990, working as a chef in both the Upland Goose and Malvina House hotels before setting up the Brasserie. Constructed to his own design, on the site of the old Globe Store and in partnership with Fortuna Ltd, it set new standards and expectations of modern dining in the Falklands.

Fortuna Ltd still owns the building, on the corner of John Street and Philomel Street, but has no part of the business.

Always entrepreneurial and keen to improve the quality of what is on offer in Stanley, among other business interests developed by Mr Olmedo over the years was the acquisition of the lease of the Waterfront Hotel, which he refurbished and upgraded and where last month he installed new managers.

Only five weeks ago Mr Olmedo launched Stanley's first upmarket boutique, Victoria & Alex, which he said had proved very successful.

FALKLAND ISLANDS

IT'S always nice to come back to the Falkland Islands; people smile and wave and welcome you. Stanley, it seems, is a friendly place... if you belong. For a number of work permit holders, generally in low-paid but important jobs, this feeling of belonging has been hard to achieve, though their faces are familiar, having been around in some cases for ten years.

Would-be "belongers," they faced the long freeze on permanent residency applications (PRP), followed by the insurmountable obstacle of the present points system, seemingly geared towards attracting the old and wealthy, but not the young and energetic, but impoverished.

A year after being formed to put things right, the Immigration Working Group is only just now talking of a revised immigration points system, placing more emphasis on appropriate skills and less on accumulated wealth, which is to be put before Executive Council early next year when it will then, one hopes, be available for public consultation. With the Economic Development Plan calling for more people to join the work force, if the economy is to grow sufficiently to allow our increasingly elderly population to keep on enjoying its present level of services, it is good that the working group is taking its time to get things right.

However, a time scale that might seem reasonable to bureaucrats or politicians can seem endless to someone who still feels second class and rejected by this society after years of industrious residency.

Historically, Falkland Islanders know all about being made to feel second class in their own country and we should not be inflicting such feelings on others who wish to make this country their home.

To avoid this and still take time to get future immigration policy right, I would propose that government should immediately grant PRP - and the right to have an equal opportunity in the job market - to all those work permit holders who have already spent five years here, without being either a burden on the taxpayer or in trouble with the police. It will not be a long list, but there are useful people on it that this country can ill afford to lose.

Perhaps this is time to recall that the person considered by some historians to have been the first authentic Falklands hero was Antonina Roxa, back in the 1800s. Among the first to seek naturalisation after the establishment of British rule, Antonina was not only a woman, but also maybe from Argentina and almost certainly black.

Fined £500 for a broken tooth

STANLEY man Ian Betts (31) was this week fined £500 after he admitted using threatening behaviour towards Dominic Henry-Roberts outside Deano's Bar on May 8.

Senior Crown Counsel Alison Inglis told the Senior Magistrate's Court on Wednesday there had been a verbal altercation between Mr Betts and another customer, Mr Travoy Stevens, inside the bar at about 11.30pm and, when Mr Betts left soon after, Mr Stevens was outside and on the ground, according to a witness.

When Mr Roberts saw Mr Betts approach the area he used one hand to push him back, an action which Mr Betts responded to with abusive names and punches. Ms Inglis said Mr Roberts thought he was hit 4-5 times on the left side of the face and found himself in the middle of the road opposite Deano's.

The punches caused Mr Roberts to suffer a broken front

tooth, and another was chipped. Defence Lawyer Keith Watson said the offence was a "one-off, spur of the moment, short duration act" and there were no racially aggravating features. He said his client was a member of the FIDF for 12 years, a retained firefighter and a self-employed plumber, was a member of the community who put a lot back into it and "bitterly regretted" the offence.

Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis said it was a "thoroughly disgraceful incident," adding that now he was aware of Mr Betts' status in the community, he must also find appearing in court disappointing.

Fining him £500, Mr Trevaskis said it was a serious offence, in a public place in front of a considerable amount of bystanders, and it was an offence society would not tolerate. Mr Betts was also ordered to pay £85 prosecution costs.

Kelper theft denied

MARIE Clifton (37) of Stanley denied the theft of £25,587.88 from the Kelper Stores and of false accounting, when she appeared in court on Wednesday. A trial date was set for December 1.

Miss Clifton is alleged to have stolen the money between October 20 2009 and April 10 2010.

Mr Trevaskis said he was aware accounting evidence created a lot

of work for defence lawyer Karen Bremner, who is due to leave the Islands in December, but it was essential the case was dealt with while she was here to represent Miss Clifton.

He said he had no wish to rush judgement but was concerned Miss Clifton should have competent representation. The trial is estimated to take at least two days.

Rape trial date lined up

IN the Supreme Court on Wednesday, Acting Judge John Trevaskis requested that the case of Matthew John Newton (23) be trial ready for January 10.

Mr Newton, of Stanley, faces three counts of sexual activity with a child and rape of a child under 13

between May 2005 and September 2009.

Mr Trevaskis said that should the Chief Justice decide to change the order of the trials listed, when he arrives in the Islands in January, Mr Newton's was far more moveable than the other two.



Runners help kickstart marathon record

MEMBERS of Stanley Running Club, local runners and supporters braved a chill Saturday morning to accompany marathon runner Marie-Louise Stenild as she began the first of a series of seven marathons over seven days.

With the Falklands standing in for Antarctica, she is hoping to complete her runs across seven continents to claim a place in the Guinness Book of World Records and to raise money for the Adam Rogers Trust, named after a 13-year-old who died of a brain tumour.

Marie-Louise and her supporters Ros Cheek, Sally Ellis, Andrew Shearer, Juan Sanchez, Anton Wolfaardt, John Barton, Governor

Nigel Haywood and Rex Eagle, started the run at 7am.

Nigel and Anton ran the full marathon, completing it in four and a half hours, with the other supporters running in stages. Kate Burston from Standard Chartered

Bank helped out on the day and verified the course distance.

Marie-Louise ran in Santiago on Sunday and is due to complete her seventh marathon in London today, after two night runs in Singapore and Cairo.

Seven up golf

ANOTHER "seven continents in seven days" sporting attempt is to be launched in the Falklands. Par 7, a charity set up to help servicemen and women who have been injured during duty, is organising a world record golf attempt next year, with teams from Britain and the USA, which must include at least two seriously injured serving soldiers, playing seven different golf courses in seven continents over seven days, starting in the Falklands on October 3.

Airbus scare

AN Airbus 380, the plane tipped to replace the current airbridge service when it finally comes into service with the RAF, was at the centre of a mid-air scare yesterday. Qantas grounded one of its Airbus 380 flights after one of its three superjumbo jets blew out an engine, shooting flames and raining large metal chunks, before making a safe emergency landing in Singapore with 459 people aboard.

Anglo-French entente not so cordiale for vet

THE future defence of the Falklands has again come under the spotlight in the UK, this time in the wake of Britain's groundbreaking agreement to share military resources with France.

Prime Minister David Cameron and French President Nicolas Sarkozy will sign two treaties designed to end years of mutual suspicion and bind the Armed Forces of both nations together for 50 years. Senior defence officials say the move will save millions and boost the fighting power of both countries.

Britain and France have pledged to share aircraft carriers from 2020, so that at least one is at sea at all times, leaving Britain dependent on French support if it were necessary to defend the Falkland Islands.

It will even see French generals taking command of the SAS as part of a rapid reaction force.

But the historic deal has enraged many, especially as it was the French Government which sold Exocet missiles to Argentina during the 1982 war. Commander John Muxworthy, a Falklands vet-

eran who is chief executive of the UK National Defence Association, branded the plan "utterly irresponsible."

"This compromises our operational integrity completely," he said. "If we need to send a carrier to protect one of our territories, and ours is in refit, and the French say, 'Well, we don't agree - you're not using ours,' we're not going to be doing much protecting."

The Falklands issue also was raised in the House of Commons on Tuesday, when Labour MP Thomas Docherty asked the Defence Secretary: "Given that the (French aircraft carrier) Charles de Gaulle will be out of service for a minimum of 18 months, and that we have no Harriers left in our Fleet Air Arm, will the Secretary of State clarify who would defend the Falkland Islands if there were an unforeseen event?"

Liam Fox responded: "The defence of the Falklands depends on our ability to deter any aggression, and that is being done through the increased use of Typhoon aircraft, our increased air defences and the presence of hunter-killer subma-

rines, which is quite sufficient. There are those who ask whether we have a plan to retake the Falkland Islands. No, no more than we have a plan to retake Kent, as we have no intention of losing them."

In a later response, Dr Fox said: "What we are trying to do is provide better co-operation when we decide to act together in our mutual interest."

Further debate followed in the House of Lords, when Lord Astor denied France might refuse to take part in a UK defence of the Falklands.

Admiral Lord Boyce said there had been "a certain amount of overreaction and hype" about some aspects of the initiative, especially on naval co-operation.

And Liberal Democrat Lord Burnett, a former Royal Marines officer, said he hoped any savings from Anglo-French cooperation could be used to save the Harrier aircraft "which are vital to our defence capability."

Lord Astor told him: "I wish that I could give you the answer that you are looking for but, sadly, I cannot give you that assurance."

CPO: hello, hello, hello

THE Royal Falkland Islands Police are to open their doors to the public next month. Chief Police Officer Gary Finchett said school children would be welcome to the open day on December 15.

In a report to today's meeting of the police committee, Mr Finchett also said he wanted to arrange a series of quarterly "have your say" meetings, where the public would be encouraged to raise issues as part of an effort to more effectively consult with the community and to improve policing as a whole.

Task Force ship sunk

THE first Royal Fleet Auxiliary vessel to enter Falkland Sound for the British landings in 1982 has been sunk - by the Americans.

Stromness carried members of 45 Commando and more than 2,750 tons of equipment to the South Atlantic, entering the Sound on May 21 and remaining in San Carlos Water for six days, often under severe air attack. She returned with more troops and equipment early the following month before sailing for the UK.

Stromness was sold to the US Navy the following year, renamed the Saturn, and was used by the US Naval Service as a combat

stores ship until being decommissioned in 2009.

Last week she was sunk off the coast of North Carolina in the US, in a sinking exercise for target practice, carried out by cruisers and destroyers from the George H W Bush Carrier Strike Group, using Harpoon anti-ship missiles and other weapons.

Store in vogue

HOT on the high heels of the Victoria and Alex Boutique, a second new fashion outlet is about to open its doors in Stanley. Discount fashion chain Peacocks, which has more than 100 overseas stores, will stretch its wings further afield when it opens for the first time in the West Store behind the café later this month.

Minimum rises

ACCORDING to the Chamber of Commerce, the draft ExCo paper on the minimum wage will be proposing a rate of £4.88 per hour. This is more than the £4.53 per hour suggested by the Minimum Wage Workshop summary, and Chamber members' comments are currently being sought.

Ups and downs

SHARES in oil prospectors Desire Petroleum have again ridden more peaks and troughs, confirming its status as the most volatile stock on the AIM market. Since doubling in value last week, it settled to a low of 90p on October 28, and had risen to 105p by market close yesterday.

Ahoy there...

THE cruise ship season proper gets under way this week, with the first of the large vessels, the 1,350 capacity Veendam, visiting Stanley on Wednesday. Passengers from the Polar Star (105), Fram (317), Plancius (110), Polar Pioneer (56) and NG Explorer (150) will also be in town next week.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

I AM ambivalent, having been damned by faint praise by the Wanderer, should I be offended, or relieved not to come under attack?

ONE year from the election, I don't think the disaster predicted by one or two in the Town Hall last 5 November materialised. In spite of some frustration at the seeming slowness of some parts of the government machine, I think the group of people you elected have achieved fair results. We've been tested by the storm of Argentine displeasure at the oil round, but weathered it well.

WE have taken threats to the economy seriously and taken steps to minimise their effect. We have committed serious money to the rural economy and hope that it starts to show returns.


NEVER complacent about education, I look forward to working on the proposals for further and higher education due soon. Catering for individuals with special needs in education and beyond has been very much ad hoc and not always equitable, so I am pleased that the director has identified a review as another high priority.

HOUSING was a major election issue and the interim provision of plots at Mink Park and Snake Hill should go a long way to shorten the waiting list of those in a position to build and awaiting a plot. Another larger site in West Stanley is under consideration and it may be possible to start a phased development if we are satisfied that both the demand and the means exist.

I TOOK a different line from that of many of my colleagues on the FIG restructure. Firstly, blaming officials for something that was clearly politically driven and approved did not seem logical. Secondly, I did not accept that FIG was, in all departments, a perfect organisation needing no improvement; we will always be some way from achieving that. Finally, I did not accept the idea that the reorganisation would achieve a £200,000 a year saving. All that said, most of the directors and other officers I work with are doing very well in keeping things moving with present limited resources.

Ex navy man's legacy of wit and adventure

AMONG the passengers on the RMS Darwin, which sailed for the Falklands from Montevideo in November 1971, was a short, fit-looking chap with a pronounced London accent, a philosophical turn of mind, and occasionally belligerent manner.

Taking him at first for some kind of short-haired beatnik, I was surprised to find that he was in fact a Chief Petty Officer in the Royal Navy.

Mike, who had joined the Navy at 15, had served on HMS Protector and was therefore no stranger to southern waters but, in 1971, he was the navigator of the SRN6 hovercraft which the Royal Navy was trialling here with varying degrees of success.

When the vessel was engaged in what was euphemistically termed "night flying" and hurtling noisily down the harbour from Moody Brook at speeds of up to 50mph, it was Mike down below peering into a flickering radar screen upon whom all aboard relied to avert disaster.

Mike's service pay book was remarkable in terms of the deep and differing impressions he had obviously made on successive commanding officers; one described Mike as "the best Chief Petty Officer that I have ever come across" while another questioned whether he should be in the navy at all. On being urged by one supportive commanding officer to

consider officer training, Mike thanked him but declined saying that he "could not take the social stigma."

Mike left the hovercraft unit in June 1972, but was to make three further trips to the Falklands, South Georgia and Antarctica aboard HMS Endurance.

He left the navy in 1977 with the intention of returning to Stanley with his first wife, Tessa.

Tragically and unexpectedly, Tessa died after a routine surgical procedure and Mike returned anyway, by himself, to be the FIC's Works Manager.

Older readers may remember him from this time wearing the bowler hat and boots which a London friend had said were essential wear for the job. On December 8

("Battle Day") 1979, Mike married Alison, a young Scottish doctor working at the KEMH. The couple had two children born in the Falklands: Daniel and Emma.

Alison, who shortly after the outbreak of hostilities in 1982 found herself acting as Senior Medical Officer, was later decorated for her crucial part in bringing the two sides together to broker a ceasefire.

Apart from supporting his wife and trying to protect the FIC's assets from Argentine depredation, Mike was largely responsible for persuading the authorities to allow Stanley civilians to set up a rudimentary Civil Defence organisation. Mike's daughter, Debbie, from his first marriage, also worked in the Stanley hospital at this time as a trainee nurse.

Saddened by a number of post-war events, but most particularly the devastating hospital fire, the Bleaney family left the Falkland Islands in 1984.

They eventually settled in St Helens in Tasmania. It was here, on October 24 at the age of 73, and surrounded by his family, that Mike, who had once been a naval boxing champion, lost his last fight against cancer, but without losing any of the adventurous, sometimes turbulent, but always generous spirit for which he was so loved by family and friends. He will be sorely missed.

Project funds available for environmentalists

LOCAL environmentalist groups are being invited to apply for a slice of government funding to help promote projects of benefit to the Falklands and South Georgia.

Now in its eighth year, the Overseas Territories Environmental Programme fund has in the past supported an albatross and petrel conservation programme, marine and native plant programmes, along with a Cobb's Wren conservation and a rockhopper foraging project.

The key themes for this year's fund will include adaptation to climate change and the promotion of

energy sustainability. Large and small-scale projects will be considered. The programme is jointly funded by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and the Department for International Development, which supports the implementation of environment charters and environmental management in the Overseas Territories.

All smiles for dentists

EXCO has agreed to reinstate one of the dental assistant posts cut by the last Assembly, "to enable most efficient use of dentists' time," said Cllr Jan Cheek. The removal of one dental assistant had caused waiting times to increase from 7-10 days to the current 5-7 weeks, and had a further effect of increasing the FTA (Failure to Attend) rate which had risen from 3% to 10% of routine appointments, said Director of Health David Jenkins. The current staffing levels are two dentists and two dental nurses.

Desire associates reap handsome oil rewards

AS Desire shareholders have enjoyed and endured another rollercoaster week on the stock market, some of those associated with the company have already struck it rich, even before any oil is found.

According to an analysis of company filings by The Daily Telegraph, directors, advisers and consultants already appear to have reaped handsome profits. The paper says:

- A consultancy connected to chairman Stephen Phipps and his sister Anna Neve, the company secretary, has been paid £3m for "management services" and rent over the years. These payments of approximately £300,000 per year continued during the years when the company was merely waiting for a rig to become free to begin drilling.

- Advisers to the company have earned almost £4m from £109m worth of rights issues and placings – the bulk going to its broker Seymour Pierce.

- Three companies connected to directors have also been em-

ployed as consultants, receiving thousands of pounds in extra fees beyond the £28,000 remuneration to each non-executive.

- Directors have benefited from an avalanche of share options granted over the years.

Two days after the first rig was hired for the Falklands, Mr Phipps sold shares worth £2m at 115.3p per share.

On the same day he bought three times as many shares for £2m under options at 32.46p per share – a 71pc discount to the traded price.

But Desire's directors also have ploughed substantial amounts of their own money back into the company and, as the share price briefly doubled last week amid speculation the company might be bought out, directors and shareholders alike can expect the swings and roundabouts to continue.

Meanwhile, Desire was this week identified by Bloomberg as the UK's most volatile stock.

And the media group said the switchback ride was likely to intensify as the summer drilling sea-

son gets under way, and as many as six fresh prospects are appraised by the end of June next year.

"Gambling is too strong a word, but you're effectively taking big bets on high-risk stuff," said Richard Rose, an analyst at Oriel Securities Ltd.

"You're going to get wild swings because small bits of information have big hits on the shares. It will stay volatile as long as they keep drilling."

"These companies excite the imagination of smaller investors," said Lionel Therond, an analyst at broker Fox-Davies Capital in London. "There's potential for big discoveries. It's high-risk, high-reward."

Desire has a 180-day historical volatility of 167 percent, an annualised measure of how much the stock has varied from its average price over the past 180 trading days. Rockhopper's volatility is 164 percent.

By comparison, The figure for Shell, Europe's largest oil company, is 24 percent.

Maggie out of hospital

FORMER British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher left hospital on Monday nearly two weeks after being admitted for tests related to a flu illness.

Baroness Thatcher was admitted to a London hospital on October 19 after failing to shake off a bout of flu.

Because of her illness, she was forced to miss a party hosted by Prime Minister David Cameron to celebrate her 85th birthday.

She was treated at Cromwell Hospital in west London and had been expected to stay only a few days, but was kept in longer as a precaution.

Her health has been of concern since she suffered a series of mild strokes in 2001 and 2002, after which she cut back on public appearances.

Murphy and Sod were to blame

IT was disappointing to miss the last meeting of the Legislative Assembly. It was the third time this year that work has taken me to West Falkland.

The first visit was when three of us went for three days in April to repair two generators at Fox Bay, and to reinstate the high voltage system for the Mt Mariah TV and radio transmitters.

The second came on October 12, when a distribution fault left residents of Fox Bay East without power for 13 hours. The electrical foreman (who I had to call in from local leave) and I travelled by FIGAS and returned to Stanley the following day.

Then on Wednesday 20th, while we had very strong winds here in Stanley, a severe storm caused widespread damage on the West, including the snapping of four power distribution poles, leaving the settlement for the second time in a week without power.

On Thursday 21st, three P&E staff crossed over on the ferry, together with two mobile workshops and a lorry with 400 metres of underground cable. Residents at Fox Bay had impressively propped the poles back up using temporary stays, one tonne bags of stone at the bases, and an assortment of vehicles and dozens of cargo straps.

With assistance from residents and the road gang, we worked until we had bypassed the broken poles and secured the new end of lines with permanent stays and one temporary stay.

I think only the Penguin News could have turned what is really a good news story of people helping themselves in trying circumstances into one of negativity and intrigue.

Finally, Stanley Power Station's one megawatt generator needs a replacement alternator. This set has been unavailable since June 2009. Brush Electrical Machines no longer manufacture this size of alternator and we are sourcing one from an Italian company called Mirelli.

RAF bigwigs get their way again

I WISH to vent my frustration that the British Government has decided to scrap the Harrier. It looks again that the Royal Air Force has got its own way.

I would remind readers that Sir Jock Stirrup stated "one nation, one air force," meaning of course the RAF. We have heard so many times that what they want in equipment they nearly always get, the prime example being the RAF pleading to get the McDonald Douglas Phantom to take over the role of the ageing Lightning. It should prove to be an extremely poor interceptor.

The government decided to take out of mothballs one of our most outstanding aircraft at that time, the Lightning. The RAF then decided that these inferior Phantoms should be used in the ground attack role, and the government wanted the Air Force to have the Blackburn Buccaneer.

One only had to look at the Phantom to realise the immense drag caused by bombs and missiles and dropped fuel tanks, whereas the Buccaneer had an internal bomb bay. Would you believe that within months RAF pilots were over the moon with the Buccaneers?

Holding out for the heroes

WHAT is it about the British and charity? It is too glib to say that we are good at it, although we undoubtedly are. We tend to respond well to people rattling tins and, perhaps more remarkably, we get up off our backsides to do things.

Here in the UK, and the Falklands is pretty much the same, we often make charity work amusing, whether it is the Children in Need telethon or a star-studded concert in a packed stadium for the benefit of wounded soldiers, sailors and airmen.

I am referring here to the remarkable Help for Heroes concert, which has probably raised about £500,000, and will certainly be put to excellent use.

But as I heard the rather predictable words of the pop stars, I wondered at a paradox. It would be more honest, fair and efficient if every citizen was required to pay more tax to help our returning combatants.

But we would not accept that. Tax is ugly. Charity is attractive. My guess is that giving gives us a buzz of virtue and salves our conscience.

I mention conscience, because the burden of our war fighting is not shared equally. Most of the men and women who serve are lower middle class or working class, and few have benefited from a good education.

Military service in the UK is not egalitarian, and the richer a family is, the less likely it is to suffer the appalling loss of a son or daughter in combat.

If we are as honest about our respect for those who serve as the popularity of the Help for Heroes concert suggested, we would, presumably, not mind if the government introduced compulsory military service for all young people.

That would be fair, but it would also be political suicide. Such is the depth of our sympathy for the young men and women who fight.

Former FI chief silences Blair

CHRIS Simpkins will be remembered in the Falklands as a former Chief Executive of FIG. In the UK he is becoming rather well known as the Chief Executive of the Royal British Legion.

Points of Law

Staff from the Attorney General's Chambers present key aspects of existing Employment Protection Legislation. This week they look at maternity benefits

UNDER the Employment Protection Ordinance (EPO) an employee who is absent from work due to pregnancy is entitled to maternity pay and has the right to return to work when she is ready. These rights are available even if she does not have a contract of employment.

Under section 39 EPO, to be entitled to these rights the employee must have been employed continuously for at least two years as at 11 weeks before the expected date of confinement.

To receive maternity pay and the right to return to work an employee must notify her employer in writing of her intended absence at least 21 days before that absence begins.

If an employer requires a medical certificate or other written evidence of her situation, the employee must provide this within 14 days of the request; otherwise she may not be entitled to her rights under the EPO. Maternity pay shall be paid for up to six weeks, starting on the first day of absence (the amount per week is calculated as nine-tenths of a normal week's pay). In the event that the employer has requested information about her absence, the employee will not receive maternity pay until information has been provided.

Employees have the right to return to work at any time (within 29 weeks from the date of confinement) to the same job, under the same terms and conditions of employment. To ensure she receives this right, the employee must write to her employer at least 21 days before the proposed date of return to work, informing them of her return.

Section 39 EPO ensures that if an employee is unfairly dismissed because she is pregnant she is still entitled to her maternity benefits under the EPO. An employee who does not receive maternity pay can complain to the Summary Court.

Many employees will have more generous maternity benefits in their contracts of employment.

The right to statutory maternity pay is reduced by any contractual maternity pay, and the employee has to choose whether to exercise their return to work under the EPO or their contract of employment (which may provide for a different length of time off work).

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Defence chiefs in tandem over FI

THE UK Chief of Defence Staff and his predecessor both spoke out in support of the Falklands over the weekend, when asked about Britain's ability to defend the Islands against the backdrop of the Strategic Defence and Security Review.

Former Chief of Defence Staff Sir Jock Stirrup said: "Could we defend the Falkland Islands? Yes, we could. I mean, let's remember that in the 1980s we didn't defend the Falkland Islands. We lost them and then had to retake them.

"We can defend the Falkland Islands. The Falkland Islands is something about which I have concerned myself greatly over the last few years.

"The Chiefs of Staff have discussed it on a number of occasions. We keep a very close eye on the Falkland Islands."

His successor, General Sir David Richards, also was asked if he was concerned over what might happen to the Falklands: "I think Sir Jock described it well: 'We keep a close eye on it,' he said.

"Don't forget that our strategy in respect of the Falklands, if such a threat was to materialise again – and I think that's a big if – is not to try to recapture it but to prevent its capture.

"And we've got troops and aircraft, very capable troops and aircraft down there, just in case that should ever be a temptation again. I don't personally think it's a huge risk. It's one we keep a weather eye on and we're well prepared to make sure it never happens again."

Saddam was nearly here

IRAQI dictator Saddam Hussein could have ended his days in the Falklands, human rights lawyer Geoffrey Robertson told a London conference on Thursday.

When the US military captured Saddam after the invasion of Iraq, it was faced with the question of what to do with him.

Mr Robertson said that because America's European military allies opposed capital punishment, they suggested the deposed leader be detained.

But proposals to send him to the Falklands, St Helena, Norway or Finland were all rejected by the US. Saddam was hanged in 2006.



A full house of penguins... and an astonishing history

IN the latest of the Penguin News series on domestic travel destinations, Tony Curran describes how he escaped to Pebble Island, and how some never made it back...

FORTY minutes by FIGAS and a world away from Stanley, Jacqui Jennings and Allan White greet my partner and I at the airstrip and invite us to the lodge. Formerly the farm manager's house, it is clean, comfortable, tidy and exceedingly homely. We join our hosts for coffee and homemade cake and biscuits in the lounge, happily sinking into the plush sofa chairs.

Allan tells us only five people live on Pebble Island now: he and Jacqui run the lodge while Raymond Evans, partner Arina and daughter Tracey run the farm, its 8500 sheep and a handful of cattle and horses.

At its peak in the 1930s and 40s the settlement boasted a population of more than 30 but, like much of Camp, it is now merely a shell of its former glory.

Pebble is the third largest of the Falklands offshore islands (26,236 acres), 19 miles long and no more than 4.5 miles wide. The lodge sits on a narrow isthmus separating West End and East End, each with their distinct characteristics, as we are to learn over the next two days.

Named after the distinctive agate stones found at its westernmost tip, Pebble island was bought by the Dean family in 1869, among the first of the wave of UK gentry to invest in the Falklands, and they remain the only family to have retained ownership since then.

They have clearly developed emotional as well as financial ties over the generations, and it is easy to see why, as we head out on the first of our two tours on this gloriously sunny spring day.

Jacqui, 44, was born and raised in Stanley, and moved to the West at 18. A fourth generation Islander, she has adopted the East End as her own.

Dominated by wetlands, the four-mile long Elephant Beach and the dramatic Tamar Pass, it is a haven for birdwatchers, the most eager of whom

fly halfway across the planet to catch a glimpse of those to whom flying comes naturally.

But it is the easternmost cliffs which take our breath away, where we are greeted by a colony of rockhoppers which, only days ago, scaled the 150-foot high face to lay their eggs. Sharing their nesting area are a couple of hundred rock cormorants, most of whom are embroiled in courtship rituals, oblivious to our presence.

We clamber partway down the cliff to shelter from the wind, where we tuck into our packed lunch and lose ourselves in the moment.

A little further along the Cape Tamar coastline, we find another sheltered spot, where the waves crash silently against the rocks half a mile away and the only noise we can hear is the rustle of the wings of the turkey vultures as they glide over our heads, chasing their shadows.

Past ponds rich with wildfowl and pasture where ewes are nurturing their newborn, we return after five hours for a coffee and a catnap.

When dinner is served it is fulsome and appetising: corn fritters, toothfish wrapped in bacon and strawberries swimming in rich homemade cream. I've heard of the Falklands stone, where newcomers reputedly put on weight thanks to the local fare. Such is the appeal of Jacqui's home cooking, we find ourselves unable to resist piling on the Pebble Island pounds.

We are left to our own devices at 9pm, and plop back into the sofa to watch a DVD, while Jacqui and Allan retire to their flat at the other end of the house.

The next day's breakfast presents a selection of full English, part Scottish (porridge) or continental, and there is more than enough to last beyond lunch, as we prepare for our second tour: this time to the West End where, for the visitor, wildlife competes with the war.

Allan, 44, is our host today and, having served in the Army before a career as an expedition cruise tour guide, he is uniquely qualified to lead visitors to his favourite hideaways and battlefield sites. As we drive past the airstrip, he offers a glimpse of

what's to come: "This is the scene of the single most historic event in the history of Pebble Island. But more of that later." Overlooking the settlement sits a ten-foot tall wooden cross embedded into a stone plinth. This is the HMS Coventry memorial, and it faces out to sea where, 19 miles away, the type 42 Destroyer succumbed to Argentine attack on May 25 1982, and turned turtle within 30 minutes of being hit.

Only a day earlier she had shot down two fighters but, when two pairs of Skyhawks were scrambled, her hours were numbered. Both the Coventry and her protector, HMS Broadsword, were in the wrong place and the wrong position at the wrong time. The Broadsword, equipped with anti-aircraft Sea Wolf missiles, couldn't fire them because the Coventry blocked her line of sight, and the warship offered easy pickings. It was only thanks to a combination of the Broadsword being alongside, incoming helicopter support and an unusually fine winter's day that 279 members of the crew were plucked out of the sea alive.

"The reason I take my time to explain this," says Allan, who has met combatants from both sides, "is because you don't get so much detail in the history books. It is a miracle for me that there are only 20 names on this monument."

Allan is only too well aware of the debt owed to the task force. And there is one more mark of respect he wants Islanders to pay: to have Cape Coventry gazetted as the place name for the point closest to its grave.

As we approach Green Rincon, and the island's only nesting colony of giant petrels, a handful of the 300 birds are shooting the breeze. The beautiful sweep of golden sand in front of us is called Stinkers Beach, after the colloquial name for the birds, because of their predilection to feast on rotting whale meat.

Within minutes, we pass another idyllic scene, where a colony of gentoo penguins has settled by a watering hole, which they share with geese, sheep, magallenic and a solitary king. Around the next country corner we come face-to-face with a few hundred rockhoppers and, almost hidden among them, a couple of macaronis.

"I set myself a target on every tour," Allan tells us. "Five breeds of penguins visit this island, and there are not many places in the Falklands where you see that. You've just scored a full house."

A little further across the moorland we happen upon another stone obelisk, built to remember a pilot and four passengers who died on this barren patch of earth.

Allan tells us they were flying at 40,000 feet in a Lear jet. It carried no weaponry, but its tail was blown off by a Sea Dart missile fired from HMS Exeter. It fell like a stone, but its cabin remained intact and, during the three terrifying minutes it took for the helpless men on board to meet their fate, every dying word was broadcast.

Someone had inadvertently depressed the radio button, and colleagues monitoring the broadcast heard the pilot say: "I'm hit. We're going down. There's nothing more you can do. Go home."

After the war, the British recovered three of the five bodies, now buried on the mainland. The other two were only discovered 12 years later. By then, though, the bodies were unidentifiable, so the five men's names appear both at the cemetery at Darwin and at Pebble Island.

We are looking at the only known Argentine war memorial in the Falklands, where two of those bodies lie. "The reason I tell people is that the bodies here were once somebody's father, somebody's son," says Allan. "They were just doing their job. It is one of the tragedies of war. It is right to show respect."

We take afternoon tea at Hawk's Nest Ledge, perched on First Mountain, which could not have been better labelled, albeit only on Jacqui and Allan's hand-drawn maps. A pair of raptors swoop above us, one making a beeline for its nest while the other keeps watch.

We pass the remains of an Argentine Dagger on our journey home, at a spot known as Hell's Half Acre. Blown out of the sky on May 24 1982, it was victim to one of the most deadly strikes of the war, when Sea Harriers destroyed three enemy planes in less than 60 seconds.

We return to the airstrip, as silent now as it was for the first three weeks of the Argentine occupation. But all that changed on April 23, when advance parties arrived to check its suitability. The operation accelerated after May 1, when the British task force arrived and the navy Sea Harriers plundered Goose Green.

The Argentines needed to reduce their losses and keep their aircraft safe and, within days, the 23 locals were joined by 300 military. "Suddenly there were aircraft and helicopters flying in and out of Pebble Island on a daily basis," says Allan.

Eleven planes sat on the airstrip, including six Pucaras, and it was only a quirk of fate which led the British to discover them, when a Sea Harrier picked up what it assumed to be a radar signal.

An advance party of eight from D Squadron 22 SAS was assigned to the recon, and the remaining 45 men joined them on the night of May 14. Their priority was to locate the radar and destroy it, after which they would attack the shearing shed, thought to be the Argentine accommodation block, and then destroy the planes.

But the operation almost came to nothing. Somehow, the squadron was split up as it crept

towards the settlement from the east. With only half the men available, they failed to find the radar, cancelled the assault on the shearing shed and were told to "do their best" with the planes parked on the airstrip.

"There was utter chaos, gunfire, explosions," says Allan, as the SAS attached explosives to the Pucaras, and dealt with the other planes through a combination of shoulder mounted rockets, grenades and machine guns.

"It must have been like a scene from a Hollywood action movie." Incredibly, no lives were lost from either side, and the squadron was on and off the island in six hours.

"It was the first land action of the Falklands War," says Allan. "A classic Special Forces hit and run attack. It is hard to believe this quiet, serene setting witnessed one of the most dramatic SAS attacks of modern times."

Before the raid, the Argentines allowed the Islanders to stay in their homes and get on with their work. But on May 15 the 23 residents were rounded up and questioned, some at gunpoint.

Farm manager Griff Evans, Raymond's father, assured them they had known nothing of the attack, but they were tense moments. "The Argentines locked them all up in the farm manager's house," says Allan. "They stayed there for 31 days until the end of the war. It was not until liberation of Pebble Island on June 15 that people realised they were actually safe and alive."

It's a dramatic end to a day of astounding reminiscences, and fifth generation Islander Allan is conscious of the gratitude owed to those who liberated the Falklands: "Our veterans can come and stay here as long as they like. It's the least we can do. The country we have today is a direct result of the commitment they made."

When we settle down to another scrumptious dinner of grilled salmon in hoisin sauce, followed by roast beef and homemade ice cream, I realise the hospitality we have enjoyed, and the breathtaking scenery we have witnessed, should never be taken for granted.

Trout surveyors seek electro-fishing help

A NEW project is seeking volunteers to help survey the Islands' streams and rivers over summer.

The Galaxiid Research Project, headed by Dan Fowler, is a two-year Darwin Initiative funded project looking at the effect of invasive brown trout on native galaxiids (zebra trout and Falklands' minnows).

One of the main dangers to zebra trout is the introduced brown trout, and the project will study the relationship between the two species and look at ways of protecting the remaining populations.

"However," Dan said, "we appreciate that brown trout are widespread, well established and highly valued in the Falklands, and the project respects that. Our focus is protecting the zebra trout, not attacking the introduced trout."

Dan plans to travel around the Falklands to establish the size and distribution of the zebra trout population. His main sampling technique will be electro-fishing, a process which involves wading through rivers wearing a backpack fitted with a motorbike battery, with the battery's terminals leading into the water.

The electric current causes the fish to swim towards the anode, from where they can be netted

prior to being weighed and measured and then safely returned to the water.

Despite always being told that water and electricity never mix, Dan emphasised it was completely safe: "Unless you're a fish."

To electro-fish effectively requires at least two people, but three is better, and this is why the project is looking for volunteers.

"We can probably attract volunteers from overseas," said Dan. "But I'd rather see locally-based individuals given the chance to get out and about and get involved with conservation."

Industry tight-lipped over sale of seats on oil flights

DESPITE weeks of speculation, there still is no confirmation that seats will be offered for sale to the public on the AGR oil flights to and from the UK.

AGR ferries oil personnel to the Falklands as part of its contract with Desire and Rockhopper to provide logistical support for the industry, and to run the well drilling programme.

The company began fortnightly flights into the Falklands in September, and was understood to be using an A310 Airbus with 194 seats, 18 of which are business class.

During the last drilling round in 1998, oil workers flew to the Falklands initially on a Boeing 747 and, in the latter stages of the operation, a Laker Airways VC10.

Then, available seats were on occasion offered to locals working within the industry.

When the Penguin News broke the story in August, there immediately was speculation that seats would once more be offered to local people – and at greatly reduced prices than those available through LAN or on the MoD airbridge.

AGR at the time said it would release more details, but then declined to comment any further.

And, while its oil industry passengers and flight crews are becoming increasingly familiar faces in Stanley, AGR has continued to refuse to answer questions from the Penguin News in relation to its empty aircraft seats.

But it is not only AGR and oil industry personnel who are remaining notoriously tight-lipped.

As stories spread of possible business arrangements involving ITT, the Falklands agent for LAN Chile, they too refused to answer the same questions.

The Penguin News understands from one informed source that a one-way passenger fare of £700 to and from Gatwick has been mooted – less than half the resi-

dent airbridge fare of £1,572 and less than a third of the standard economy fare of £2,244.

A spokesperson for the MoD would not offer details on flight arrangements between AGR and Mount Pleasant, but did confirm that “informal discussions” had taken place with Members of the Legislative Assembly regarding the potential sale of seats.

“The terms and conditions of the contract between AGR and MoD on the use of the airfield at MPC and handling assistance

provided by BFSAI are commercial in confidence,” said the spokesperson.

“We are not privy to any plans private companies may have had for sale of spare capacity or at what cost.

“There have been informal discussions between BFSAI and MLAs on this matter.

“MoD/BFSAI has no further comment to make at this time.”

When the Penguin News sought comment from Assembly members, they too declined to re-

ply. However, Chief Executive Tim Thorogood said the Falkland Islands Government would welcome seats becoming available to the public, a view he said the government had expressed to both the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and the MoD.

“FIG has no direct role in this as it is between MoD and AGR,” said Mr Thorogood.

“However, FIG’s view is that AGR should be able to make seats available to non-oil personnel if it wishes, and that this would be of benefit to the Islands, particularly during the period of the runway refurbishment when the airbridge is difficult.

“That view has been expressed to the FCO and the MoD.”

Mr Thorogood said he understood the agreement between the UK and US in respect of flights using Ascension Island, which places restrictions on certain flights, might have caused a difficulty.

But a spokesperson for the FCO told the Penguin News: “The terms of the discussions on operating the charter were a matter between the oil companies and the MoD and had nothing to do with the Ascension Island Agreement.”

Mr Thorogood added, though, that the release of new passenger seats via AGR could have a negative impact on airbridge flights.

“If seats were sold, the downside for residents is that if a large number of people took them up, and this reduced the take-up of seats on the airbridge, then the cost of the airbridge seats would rise as the cost of the flights would be spread amongst fewer passengers. That could lead to much higher airbridge fares.”

But, unfortunately for those people who would like to see a third operator enter the Falklands flight market, no one else involved appears willing to talk about it.

FOR a while this week anyone in the Falkland Islands whose phone number appeared in any reporter's contact list was being besieged for comment about the accusation that British defence cuts were going to invite a new Argentine invasion.

The same accusation had been made the previous week, but had an extra flavour coming from a group of men for whom the Falklands conflict had probably marked the zenith of their military careers. They, like perhaps many of us who lived through it all, are emotionally stuck in 1982 and somehow unaware that the world has moved on.

As UK Defence Secretary Liam Fox said, and as our Legislative Assembly has affirmed, there is no need for a plan for a retaking of the Falkland Islands because we have the will and the military means to prevent anyone taking them by force again.

Whatever the rights and wrongs of the Harrier versus Tornado argument, we have the Typhoon, the men and all the other weaponry so severely lacking in 1982.

The sad truth is that fewer and fewer people in Britain either know or care about the Falklands, except as the place named in occasional TV clips of Sir Galahad burning and Harrier jump jets taking off from aircraft carriers. Early mention of the Falkland Islands in this week's news soon gave way to the sexier story of rioting students in London.

I think taxi drivers are a kind of litmus paper for national opinion, and the ones I spoke to in Buenos Aires recently felt that the invasion of the Islands was a huge mistake which should not have happened and should not happen again. It is worth remembering, too, that in the years since 1982 the influence, power and resources of the Argentine military have been much reduced.

There is a war with Argentina going on unreported, however. Since the beginning of the Kirchner regime the Argentine government has been doing all it can to isolate us and stifle our economic development.

It would be good to see the British press getting excited about this, rather than trying to conjure up some nostalgia-fuelled military crisis or hyped-up prediction of the Falklands as the new Kuwait.

I very much hope that this is something that FIG's new public relations agency will be able to get a grip on. **John Fowler**

Woman admits harassment by text messaging

COOPERATION between the Royal Falkland Islands Police and their colleagues in St Helena led to the appearance of an MPA woman in Stanley Magistrate's court on Wednesday, charged with harassment.

After an anonymous phone call had been received in St Helena, containing what appeared to be a death threat to their daughter who works at MPA, the woman's parents contacted the island's police who asked the Royal Falkland Islands Police to investigate.

On questioning the person whose life appeared to have been threatened it was discovered that she had received some 20 text messages, described as being "of a rude and threatening nature," from Sylvia Jean Francis of MPA and wished to press charges against her.

Thirteen messages, some of which the prosecution described as "of an unpleasant sexual nature," were discovered on Miss Francis's phone.

In defence of Miss Francis, who pleaded guilty to the charge of harassment, Mr Keith Watson

said that his client had discovered that her partner of four years had established a relationship with another woman and had wanted her to feel as "angry and upset" as this news had made her feel.

She denied her phone call to St Helena had been a death threat, suggesting that the word "bad" had been misheard as "dead."

In view of the fact that the reported harassment had lasted for only a short time and had been followed by no further contact between Miss Francis and her victim, Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis said he believed that the situation had now been concluded.

While Miss Francis's conduct had been "unpleasant and intentional" he was satisfied that there were no aggravating features and possibly some mitigating features.

This, coupled with Miss Francis's early guilty plea, led him to agree with her defence counsel that an appropriate sentence was a conditional discharge for 12 months.

Miss Francis was also asked to pay the costs of £85 requested by the prosecution.

Banned for foolishness

IN the Magistrates Court on Wednesday Stanley man John Morrison was banned from driving for 12 months and made to pay a total of £435 after admitting to driving on the Stanley to Darwin road with over the prescribed limit of alcohol on Sunday October 31.

Describing Mr Morrison's action as "a foolish offence," Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis said that he gave him full credit for an early guilty plea and no previous convictions, but he had no option but to impose the ban, which was the minimum mandatory penalty.

Assault sentence deferred

KYLE Kieran Lee Joshua was told in the Magistrate's Court on Wednesday morning that sentencing in his case would be deferred till December 9, pending a report from the Probation Service.

The court was told that Mr Joshua, who had previously pleaded guilty to the charge of as-

sault made against him, now accepted some of the facts of the prosecution's case which he had disputed in an early court appearance.

Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis advised Mr Joshua that he would be considering all the sentencing options open to him.

Horrors of war ignored, says veteran

A FALKLANDS veteran is among a group of ex-servicemen who this week have criticised the increasing "glamour and glitz" of the annual poppy appeal.

In a letter to the Guardian, they say the appeal has been launched with "showbiz hype" and "the true horror and futility of war is forgotten and ignored."

Veteran Ken Lukowiak said: "I don't have a problem with the British Legion, which does wonderful work, but it is the sanitisation which concerns me."

"Part of me wants to be sensitive to the families who have lost loved ones and part of me wants to throw a bucket of blood into the living rooms of the nation every night to show people the true meaning of war."

"This year's poppy appeal is too much glamour and glitz."

Ex navy chiefs stir up another war of words

AN open letter to The Times, in which ex Royal Navy chiefs criticise UK defence spending cuts, has again sparked a flurry of claims and counter-claims over the future defence of the Falklands.

The retired commanders, who include former navy chief Lord West and former 1982 Task Force commander, Major General Julian Thompson, said the decision to scrap the Harrier jets, which played a major role in the Falklands War, was "strategically and financially perverse."

They wrote: "In respect of the newly valuable Falklands and their oilfields, because of these and other cuts, for the next ten years at least, Argentina is practically invited to attempt to inflict on us a national humiliation on the scale of the loss of Singapore. One from which British prestige, let alone the administration in power at the time, might never recover."

Lord West later told BBC Radio that the Falklands were an example to illustrate the lack of capability: "It applies all around the world," he said. "The only way to get fixed-wing air covering our troops is to have them on aircraft carriers. The Tornado can't get to any of these places."

"What we mustn't forget is that the Argentines still see sovereignty as a major issue. If the islands were captured we have absolutely no way whatsoever of recovering them unless we have got carrier air."

PRIDE of place at a remembrance service in the UK yesterday was a special variety of poppy bred to commemorate the 1992 war.

The Falklands Poppy, a frilled "super-poppy" variety which was named to honour the 25th anniversary of the Falklands campaign, was the symbol of this year's remembrance at a special ceremony at the Scottish Agricultural College at Auchincruive in Ayrshire.

Veterans attending included sufferers from PTSD, or post-traumatic stress disorder, supported by the charities Gardening Leave and Combat Stress.

Anna Baker Cresswell set up the serviceman's support group Gardening Leave to provide "horticultural therapy" for veterans.

When in 2007 she was invited to name a new poppy which had recently been bred, the Falklands Poppy was born, the 68th variety in Scotland's national collection.

forced politicians in both the Falklands and Britain to reiterate their confidence in the defence of the Islands.

Members of the Legislative Assembly on Wednesday issued the following statement: "The Falkland Islands Government is satisfied by and grateful for the levels of defence on the Islands, which Her Majesty's Government has assured us are adequate to maintain an effective deterrent."

"There are no direct defence cuts relating to the Falkland Islands. Members of the Legislative Assembly are content with the reassurances that they have been given by HM Government that the Strategic Defence Spending Review does not in any way change the UK's ability to maintain the deterrent in the Islands."

Defence Secretary Liam Fox also repeated his assurances, just days after responding similarly to criticism of the Strategic Defence and Security Review from a former Falklands veteran, reported in last week's Penguin News.

"It is simply not the case that decommissioning the Harrier would impact upon our ability to defend territories in the South Atlantic," he said. "We maintain a wide range of assets, not least a well defended airfield with Typhoon aircraft to ensure the defence of the Falkland Islands. We have a far greater presence than previously, able to respond to any and all threats."

However, shadow defence secretary Jim Murphy said the gov-

ernment had not been able to convince the country or "our most senior ex-navy commanders" that Britain would not need Harriers over the next decade.

"Can the government guarantee that Britain's strategic interest around the world will not be harmed by their decision?" he said.

"Our country's friends have passed polite comment and our own military experts are deeply concerned. It is bewildering for a maritime nation to build two new aircraft carriers yet leave them devoid of carrier strike capability for a decade."

The latest row came just 24 hours after Foreign Secretary William Hague said the Falklands dispute must not get in the way of Britain boosting its relations with Latin America.

Speaking at the annual Canning Lecture on British-South American relations, he made clear there would be no change to Britain's sovereignty over the Falklands, but he said: "It is our intention not to let differences come in the way of closer cooperation."

"There will be no change to Britain's long-standing position on the Falkland Islands. But this should not be an obstacle to the positive relations we seek."

Argentine Foreign Minister Hector Timerman, responding to last week's remarks by Mr Fox, told Buenos Aires radio on Friday that his country would not attack the Islands, and that the only way to "recover" them was through peaceful negotiations.

New oil rig due

BORDERS & Southern Petroleum has delayed by almost a year the targeted drilling date for its first two wells in the South Falklands Basin. The company has signed a letter of intent with Ocean Rig UDW for the provision of a rig, which is expected to arrive towards the end of next year. Desire Petroleum, meanwhile, has indicated it will press ahead with drilling a second well on the Rachel prospect in the north basin.

Head suspended

THE head teacher of the Falkland Islands Community School has been suspended from duty. Assistant Director of Education, Richard Fogerty, said Alastair Baldwin had on Friday been suspended as a procedural measure while inquiries were made into allegations against him. Mr Fogerty said no further details would be released due to the sensitivity of the matter.

Cubs remember

CUB Scouts this week planted daffodil bulbs in the 1982 Memorial Wood for Remembrance week, ahead of their wreath carrying duties on Sunday, when the Cathedral hosts a morning service and the Act of Remembrance takes place at the Cross of Sacrifice. A memorial service also was held last night at Sapper Hill.

HM's facebook

THE Queen launched herself on facebook this week, attracting Royalists, republicans and even Argentines demanding the return of the Falklands. Moderators of "The British Monarchy" page were forced to remove abusive comments by saboteurs who posted anti-Royal messages.

Family dance

THE Town Hall plays host to a Falklands family dance tomorrow, in aid of the Poppy Day appeal. Entertainment includes traditional dancing and the Fighting Pigs band, and doors open at 7.30pm. A bar will operate in the refreshment room, and tickets are £5 on the night.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

EVERYONE has a favourite gripe; mine this week is litter.

I observe regularly that the young are not the worst culprits; many are very litter conscious and carry it until they find a bin. Some of their elders are not so careful. I've seen some open vehicle windows to throw out rubbish as they speed past my house. I regularly pick up beer cans, sweet wrappers and crisp and cigarette packets.

I'm not aware of Lewis's litter law, passed many, many years ago, having ever been enforced. Perhaps its time has come.

WITH the arrival of the first tourist vessels I hope we are reaching the point where someone takes a grip for a future season on the madness that ensues when two or more large ships arrive on the same day.

Visitors who cannot book tours and just mill around trying to get into shops must have a very poor experience that does nothing to enhance the image of the Islands.

Furthermore, if two large vessels arrived on different days it would give tour operators two days' work instead of one.

It cannot be beyond the wit and will of man to bring common sense to bear and publish, years in advance if necessary, a seasonal calendar with one space daily for large ships or two or three smaller ones.

Of course, there would be initial screams of protest, but everyone knows that there is some flexibility already built into itineraries to deal with sail-bys and adverse weather. Most ships have the ability to speed up slow down as required to fit the programme.

DURING a meeting looking at future provision of health services it was confirmed that from being a country with low rates of heart problems 30 years ago, lifestyle changes have reversed that position.

Televisions, greater use of vehicles and oil-fired central heating instead of the daily round of peat work have all played some part.

Primary healthcare and all kinds of preventative medicine must become ever more important, and probably cheaper in the long term, than patching people up when they become unwell.

Paperwork is painful, risen to the challenge

AN editorial comment in the Penguin News inspired Dick Sawle to compile a list of what he saw as the major achievements to date of the current Legislative Assembly. Twelve months on from the election, we invited Cllr Sawle to present his year in review...

THE initial hit between the eyes is without doubt the amount of paperwork a new Member is given to read – all of it important, but hard to digest and even harder to recall when you need to.

You choose your portfolios. The yardstick I used was simple – where I felt I could be the most effective and useful.

Then it's a matter of getting stuck in and seeing if you can achieve your objectives.

Just keeping up with the flow of information on a daily basis via email is also an enormous task. The inbox gets hit with approximately 60 emails per day according to my server, with approximately 40 being sent daily; some of them not so important, but some of them are, and it all takes time.

However, it's a satisfying and enjoyable job if you like a demanding lifestyle!

I have written a list out of what I believe that we as an Assembly have achieved and also those important matters where work has been done but is still work in progress.

I'm sorry to say that the list is incomplete, but it's incomplete for a few good reasons – some because I can't report on confidential items.

I can see the good reasons why, but I do find that to be one of the frustrations at times of the job. It's also incomplete because it is from memory and glancing at my diary!

The other thing that quickly becomes apparent when you write a list is that it is well-nigh impossible to say what you have done as an individual because, like it or not, all achievements are collective and attributable to the Assembly as a whole – it's only the degree of personal input that changes.

On decision making, I believe that it's good to see that we do not always agree; there is a very healthy level of debate amongst us and that's democracy at work! It means you have to work hard to justify your views and that is how it should be.

I believe that collectively we have much improved consultation and interaction with the public.

This is not just via Facebook, articles in the Penguin News, public meetings or email shots, which are all good tools, but also on a one-to-one basis when out and about or, of course, meetings ar-

ranged to discuss individual constituent's problems.

There are quite a few of these and not all achieve the success the constituent wants, but many of them do, and I certainly find that satisfying.

FIMCO was a challenge and, as a business, difficult to get to grips with, but I am delighted with the support we have given it and know it will be a success. It's a good example of public-private partnership.

The budget was another big challenge. What was clear to me then was that we all benefit in one way or another from the Falklands system and, whilst taxation is never pleasant, it was important the tax base be widened.

Unpopular? Yes, there is no doubt but, compared to the UK for example, we have not suffered too much and have managed to keep our public services more or less intact. I do believe that cutting services would have been a very unattractive alternative.

Port development hasn't moved on a great deal, but for good reasons. We need to be sure that any public funds spent on this (and it will be a very large public expense) are spent wisely.

Fishing companies need to be fully involved and engaged in order to make it successful if it is to benefit their industry, and a new approach from the MoD means we may perhaps have other alternatives to those originally envisaged.

We do have time – FIPASS will not sink tomorrow, and maybe it is going to take longer than we thought. In the meantime, we have invested in a new container park and I believe that the speed with which we reacted to the private sector's needs, and also the country's requirements, was commendable and unusual.

The Economic Development Strategy (EDS) is another big piece of work. Part A (setting the scene) and Part B (what are we going to do about it) and now the annual action plan (next practical steps) are complete.

This is important to us all and represents a huge change in the way the Falklands does business. For the first time FIG and the private sectors are coming together with

common aims. Many times this has inevitably caused friction and debate, but I believe it is now on track and the next big challenge (ask me in another year!) will be if FIG has kept its side of the bargain and, of course, if the private sector has also.

It's a bit like asking two people who don't normally get on to get married so they can each survive – an uneasy symbiotic relationship which we both need if we are both to survive. We are going to have to work at it collectively.

Two frustrations I have relate to the move of the Museum to the dockyard and the review of the immigration system. Neither has moved as fast as I would have liked.

However, another point that has become increasingly clearer to me during the course of the first year is that within FIG there are very few people at the top to push progress forwards, and we ask a lot of them.

We effectively removed two posts in the first year – Head of Executive Management and also Major Projects Director. We did this for good reasons, but do need to think about the lack at times of human resources to carry out what is a very tightly packed agenda.

There is another type of progress which I would label small things that mean a lot to people.

I would place a few things in this category – the restoration of FI Status to those who "lost" it when the Constitution changed, the abolition of family allowance means testing, FIGAS restructure, sale of house to tenants at Fitzroy, changing the law so motocross can take place at Fairy Cove (personal interest declared here!) and the new Queen's Award established.

Turning to TV and radio, we now have a situation (as promised) where everyone can receive a digital TV signal either in Camp via satellite or in town via broadcast.

The same applies to radio. More improvements are underway to the FM network and what we have now is more than we had before, and there is no charge for it, although that is still up for debate!

There is also a local TV station (FITV) that will soon be up and running with Stanley Service's help. I believe that TV and radio are essential community services and FIG has met with its obligations to provide.

On Cable and Wireless issues it is good to see that the internet services have greatly improved.

There is still a long way to go though – especially on issues such as pricing and charging for over-usage, which is perhaps the biggest and most frequent complaint that I receive. The Doyle reports

since 2004 have finally been acted upon. We have legislation up to the November Assembly which will at last give FIG's regulator powers to regulate, and customers an established procedure for disputes. Following this legislation will come regulation to ensure that everyone has a fairer deal, and a code of practice will be established that will, I hope, deal with the details that cause the daily problems.

Business packages have improved. We now have objective monitoring of the quality of the internet and Andrew Newman is established as the regulator.

There is still more work to be completed and further improvements will follow over the course of next year. There was a lot of catching-up to be done and still a fair way to go yet.

A question I would like to raise soon is that of a single constituency. We all represent everyone and the old division of Camp and Stanley doesn't seem to me to

have any logic to it anymore. This is something I will be raising this next year for debate and discussion.

I have been able to attend a variety of conferences over the last year (OTCC and CPA). I've also given a number of interviews to both friendly and not so friendly press. This has been an interesting experience for me and a steep learning curve.

One of the challenges that face the Falklands is that of foreign affairs, and it would be foolish to ignore the harsh fact that recent oil developments have had a dramatic effect on our international position.

I believe (and I would welcome everyone's views on this) that we should adopt a more proactive stance in stating our case more clearly and more frequently. I am disappointed that more of our Commonwealth colleagues do not support us. I believe it's a process of education and persuasion with

Caribbean colleagues. We have a lot in common with them and their position really reflects their lack of understanding rather than any intransigence. Our neighbours have done a good job of clouding the issues with a fog of false historical evidence and even the UN has, in my view, been hoodwinked.

There is no doubt at all that the FCO fights our corner well, but I believe the simple truths sound better when they come direct from the Falklands.

Our international voice should not just be heard at the UN C24 each year. Whilst this is vital in terms of keeping the pressure up, we should also in my view, be more actively engaged elsewhere and I would welcome views on this. This time next year? Let's see, and let's hope it will prove to have been equally as interesting and varied.

Port and profit risks heritage

IF rumour control is correct the proposed new deep water oil support dock at Port San Carlos is going to be built slap bang in the middle of the settlement.

The buzz is that the entire settlement section owned by Cantray, including houses, wool shed and other buildings, will be flattened to make way for this project. If this is correct then it will mean that the remaining farm owners at Race Point Farm will be living within metres of a massive industrial site which surely would put at risk their wellbeing, both from a safety and business point of view.

While it does sound very exciting to have this kind of development in Camp, why destroy another piece of our identity, when surely there is available to this company thousands of other acres suitable for such a project?

Port San Carlos, or KC as it is better known, was one of the earliest East Falkland establishments in the rural sector and is steeped in history.

I wonder if any part of this settlement is in fact heritably protected. One might also question the legality of building so close to someone else's private dwelling site. Would it not be a better option to have the site further north and clear of the main settlement?

If this proposal is indeed true, maybe the company might respond with some confirmation – and what are their plans for the rest of the sheep farm, because without a shed and other farm facilities it would be difficult to operate?

What was the agreement's terms of purchase regarding farming practice?

Of course, as already said, this information comes from rumour control, but maybe does merit some explanation to the general

We all know only too well the power of the oil industry and how they can and often do influence the workings of a country's government system.

All too often these tycoons ignore the feelings of people because they are money driven.

For the record, the idea was the brainchild of Stefan Heijtz, something of an expert when it comes to Falklands' philately.

In March of this year Stefan offered to try and build a national collection for the Museum.

It was not expected that all the stamps would be obtainable and Stefan expected that even a partially complete collection would take a considerable time to put together.

Thanks to an incredible level of support from the FI Philatelic Study Group (FIPSG), a 100 per cent complete collection came together in just seven months.

The efforts of this small group are remarkable and they are to be congratulated on what they have achieved. I believe that all those contributors could realistically have expected to see some thanks recorded in your article.

On behalf of the board and staff of the M&NT, I would like to say that we are tremendously grateful to the FIPSG for what is a truly exceptional donation.

Particular thanks are due to Dr John Henshall who helped with many of the rarer stamps, and to Stanley Gibbons Ltd for the very generous donations of two very important items but, most of all, we would wish to express our gratitude to Stefan Heijtz for his outstanding effort.

We will continue to build on the National Stamp Collection and hope to exhibit it (possibly in instalments) in the near future.

October one of the windiest

THE third windiest October since MPA records began in 1986 also was drier and sunnier than normal, with above average temperatures.


The mean maximum was 11.6 Celsius compared with an average of 10.6C. The top temperature recorded was 19.4C on the 25th and the lowest maximum was 6.5C on the 5th. The mean minimum was 3.8C, against an average of 2.5C. The lowest minimum was -0.9C on the 5th and the highest minimum was 8.4C on the 20th.

Total rainfall was only 23mm, compared with an average of 34.8mm. The wettest day was the 2nd with a total of 7.6mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 14 days and 1mm or more fell on six days.

There were 216.5 hours of sunshine, compared with an average of 181.8 hours, which was only bettered in 2009 when 231.4 hours was recorded. The highest daily total was 13 hours on the 15th.

There were two days when sleet or snow fell, well below the average of seven days, two days with hail, one with fog and none with thunder.

The monthly mean wind speed was 17.4 knots, compared to an average of 15.9. The highest hourly mean speed of 45 knots and the highest gust of 62 knots were both on the 20th. Gales occurred on 11 days, and there were 18 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots.

Fisheries group at China expo

THE Falklands and South Georgia took their place in a world class fisheries exhibition in China last week.

Georgia Seafoods, part of the Fortuna Group, was one of more than 750 companies exhibiting at the 15th annual China Fisheries and Seafood Expo held in Dalian.

There were representatives from 450 Chinese companies alone, with national pavilions from many other countries, and more than 15,000 qualified buyers from around the world.

The Georgia Seafoods stand was manned by James Wallace, with support from a translator and an assistant. James said it was a huge success and many visitors commented that the stand was one of the busiest at the show, attracting more than 500 visitors.

Several important deals were signed during the three days. The Chinese market for seafood is now larger than that of the United States and there was a keen interest among buyers in talking direct to James as a vessel owner.

One of the main objectives also was to develop closer relationships with the end users of Falkland and South Georgia products, in addition to developing wider contacts and building awareness of domestic seafood in this rapidly developing market.

Following the expo, James took the opportunity to visit a number of major clients and to see the facilities at some processing plants where another company of the Fortuna Group, Loligo Products Limited, has contracted squid processing for a number of years.

Points of Law

Staff from the Attorney General's Chambers present key aspects of existing Employment Protection Legislation. This week they look at unfair dismissal

UNDER section 52 of the Employment Protection Ordinance every employee has the right not to be unfairly dismissed by their employer, provided they have been continuously employed for two years and are aged under 65 (men) or 60 (women).

This proviso does not apply to dismissal for trade union reasons.

Dismissal is unfair in the following circumstances:

1. Where an employee is dismissed because she is pregnant, or for a reason relating to her pregnancy. If the employee is in fact unable to work because of pregnancy, her employer must offer her any suitable employment which is available. This must be on no less favourable terms than her previous employment.
2. Where an employee is dismissed because they (a) are a member of an independent trade union, (b) have taken part in trade union activities or (c) have refused to join a trade union.
3. Where an employee is dismissed because they were locked-out by the employer or have taken part in a strike or other industrial action, and other employees similarly involved in the dispute have not been dismissed.

4. Where an employee is dismissed because they are no longer required, but the employer failed to follow an established redundancy procedure.

If an employee is told that they are filling in for someone who is absent, and that their employment will be terminated when the permanent employee returns to work, their dismissal shall not be considered "unfair."

An employee can complain to the Summary Court that they have been unfairly dismissed.

The court will look at how the employer acted and identify the principal reason for the dismissal.

Dismissal is not unfair if the employer acted reasonably, and had a good reason for dismissal such as the capability or qualifications of the employee, the conduct of the employee, the redundancy of the employee or a duty or restriction which prohibited the employee continuing in employment.

If dismissal is found to be unfair, the court may arrange for the employee to be reinstated (if the employee wants this) or to be paid compensation by the employer.



South American red tape adds to local shipping frustrations

BRAZILIAN bureaucracy, or maybe the natural reluctance of a major exporter to put itself out over such a small market as the Falkland Islands represents, would seem to be the principal snags encountered since the change in their shipping operation made in July by South American Atlantic Services Ltd (SAAS).

Local SAAS Director Tom Blake told the Penguin News that although the present vessel in use was slightly smaller than its predecessor, with 83 reefer plugs and the ability to take full 40 foot containers it had much the same capacity.

Using Rio Grande in Brazil instead of Montevideo as the SAAS vessel's principal port added less than 30 hours on a typical round trip, and the port was equally well connected to the main container routes, said Mr Blake.

The only significant difficulty encountered so far had been with regard to the sourcing of eggs, dairy products, fruit and vegetables in Brazil which could be certified for importation to the Falklands.

Hamish Wylie of the Sealish Chandlery thought that this was

"a bit of a nonsense" where eggs were concerned, claiming that, unlike Chilean eggs, Brazilian eggs did at least carry a date stamp.

Senior Government Veterinary Officer Steve Pointing explained that the problem lay with those products exported by Brazil which were not compliant with European Union importation standards.

Similar problems with exports from Uruguay and Chile had been overcome by the Falkland Islands working with the authorities in those countries to establish their own standards.

This had been particularly successful in the case of Chile where he now enjoyed a very good working relationship with a number of key officials.

So far, despite extensive efforts involving the British Embassy in Brazil, Mr Pointing said he had been unable to develop any kind of personal relationship with anyone in MAPA, the Brazilian ministry for Agriculture, Livestock and Food Supply responsible for certification.

He had hoped to make a visit to the Rio Grande region in November to meet with health officials, port authorities and local

suppliers of eggs and dairy products, but was now being told that he could only meet with officials in the capital Brasilia, who were likely to be too busy to see him until after Christmas.

Falkland Islands Chamber of Commerce President, Roger Spink, signalled similar delays in getting together a delegation of local business people to go to Brazil in search of products to import.

So far, said Mr Spink, there had been limited interest from the Chamber's members but this might be due both to lack of information and also lack of availability of people to go at this busy time of the year.

Asked about the impact on the Falkland Island Company (FIC) of the Argentine Government's Declaration 256, which requires all shipping going to the Falklands from South America to seek permission from Buenos Aires, Mr Spink said that it had only a minor effect.

His company had to some extent anticipated the problem and taken steps to order more goods from the UK.

Mr Spink said that that the principal victims of the Argentine

Declaration had been suppliers in Chile who had lost a significant amount of business.

For this reason he thought it might be sensible for Chilean businesses to get together "to test the situation."

Someone also in favour of testing the seriousness of the Argentine threat to shipping bound for the Falklands is Tim Miller of Stanley Growers, the Islands' major importer of fresh fruit and vegetables.

Mr Miller agreed with Roger Spink about the damage to businesses in Punta Arenas, some of which have had to lay off workers as a result. He said: "I think we should have challenged them after the British Government stated that their action had no validity in international law."

Mr Miller says that he would join the proposed Chamber of Commerce visit to Brazil "if I can find someone to talk to."

Meanwhile, he is warmed by rumours that a Chilean group may be looking for a vessel with which to challenge the Argentine attempts to isolate the Islands.

"That would be an ideal situation," he told the Penguin News.

Argentine wool man set to return to the Islands where he hoped to forge trade

VETERAN Argentine wool-man Joaquin (Jack) B Allolio (71), whose Falklands/Argentine agricultural trade ambitions were interrupted by the war, is to achieve his dream of returning to the Falkland Islands after 30 years.

In 1981 Jack was manager of Caminos & CIA SA, a new wool exporting company wholly owned by Rio Gallegos farmers.

Jack convinced his principals it would be an "interesting initiative" to visit the Islands in search of trade. This was to involve selling sheep genetics and eventually live rams, as well as general supplies, and at the same time buy up some of the Islands' produce, like sheep and lambs for slaughter in Tierra del Fuego, and eventually sheepskins and even wool to be processed in Argentina.

"I always liked geography, history and maps," said Jack. "So it was natural that during the years I took a particular interest on those far away islands and, like any schoolboy in Argentina, I was taught about the Islands and the entire situation entailed."

Jack's trading initiative was at the time supported by Colin Smith from Knaresborough in Yorkshire, his wool agent in the

UK, and part owner of San Carlos. At the end of May 1981 he made the journey to Comodoro Rivadavia and flew to the Falklands to be received by the Secretary of the Sheep Owners Association, Jim Clement.

"My first evening in Stanley was socially quite pleasant, meeting most important local people at the Colony Club, during a cocktail celebrating Terry Spruce's anniversary," said Jack.

"At the Upland Goose Hotel I met Governor Rex Hunt and the General Manager of the Falkland Islands Company (FIC).

The next day Richard Cockwell took me to the floating store of the FIC to inspect some sheepskins, which I later bought up and were then shipped first to BA and onwards to a final destination in Mazamet, in Southern France."

During his visit he was able to meet with a great number of Falklands farmers and he left with the aim of eventually buying live sheep

and lambs. Unfortunately for the future of Falklands/Argentine agricultural relations the 1982 invasion interrupted.

"The conflict was a big disappointment for me, because all of our personal and commercial efforts went down the drain," said Jack. "In the subsequent years I kept in contact with a few growers and,

little by little, kept building up personal connections and trying to be useful with technical and breeding information.

"My contact with the Australian and British officials of the DOA has grown closer in the recent time simply because now they know I have access to a lot of technical information on wool, sheep and lambs. The other way round, recently I translated into Spanish an interesting article on sheep genetics, with permission from The Wool Press.

"Despite my obvious main professional interest in wool, sheep, farming and management plus ge-

netics, I have a genuine visitor's interest in the Islands, first of all their people, and second their geography and history.

"It would be naive to tell you I have neutral feelings about the Islands, but all this time after a stupid conflict I understand that pilots from both sides have met, even with those who shot them down.

"My mother was Argentine, my father German, and I was born in Rivera, Uruguay. I am a real Mercosur product with mixed origins: an Italian family name and direct German and Argentine ancestors. There's no need for flag waving as far as I am concerned."

Jack's initial dream was to return to the Islands to purchase greasy wool to be processed in Argentina and then exported as wool tops, grown in the Falklands, processed in Patagonia (in one of Trelew's combing mills) and then shipped abroad to world markets.

"My dream now is much more limited; just meeting people, enjoying their genuine hospitality, and offering useful information, as I do with my articles here and in Chile for the farming magazines."

Jack will visit the Falklands at the end of January next year.

THOSE driving along Ross Road recently may have noticed a flurry of activity around the Cathedral tower area.

But if not, they'll certainly have spotted the newly-refurbished clock dials which were replaced last week, and now appear bright and gleaming.

All four solid copper dials, now painted shiny black and with freshly gilded numerals, were hoisted into position using ropes secured inside the tower on its heavy timber rafters.

At the same time, whilst securely fastened on a separate rope, and festooned with high-tech climbing equipment, Peter Biggs of the FIDF helped guide each dial in turn to specially constructed timberwork frames.

The delicate operation was completed from the inside by Rob Ijssel, who attached each dial in turn to specially constructed timberwork frames.

The gilded hour and minute hands of two of the dials are now also in position and the other two sets of hands are to be replaced shortly.

With the dials in place, everything is ready to begin the installation of an electronic master clock, linked to a GPS system.

The new clock and power unit will utilise the gear sets and dial motionwork of the original clock,

and includes an electromagnetic bell hammer to strike the tenor bell on the hour. The master clock can be programmed to provide automatic tolling of a bell prior to services and the bell can be silenced during the hours of darkness.

If a mains failure occurs, the hands will remain stationary until power is restored, after which the master clock's battery back-up will immediately drive the hands to the correct time.

The original clock mechanism is now carefully preserved in situ as part of the heritage of the Cathedral. The Cathedral Council hopes it will not be too long before the new clock is announcing Stanley time... precisely.

When quoted in US Dollars the international wool market is the highest it has been since 1999, and when quoted in pounds is near still. Experts are suggesting a correction is inevitable as these prices are thought to be not sustainable, just when this will happen is the important question.

Heavy workload for planning committee, but port deferred

WITH 20 applicants seeking planning permission and 14 building permit submissions to be reported on, this month's meeting of the Planning and Building Committee was expected to be one of the longest for a number of years.

In addition, the committee, chaired by Councillor Sharon Halford, also had to consider statements by the appellant and the Environmental Planning Officer (EPO), Antony Payne, concerning an appeal to Executive Council against the refusal of permission for the covering over of north and south doors of the entrance porch to the Tabernacle in Barrack Street.

Following consideration of two matters arising from the minutes of last month's meeting concerning other appeals to ExCo, the committee moved on to review applications and made decisions granting conditional planning permission for a number of applicants:

- Erection of cattery and kennels at Fitzroy Settlement for Iain Thom and Pauline Sackett
- Demolition of The Old Butchery on Moody Brook Road for the Falkland Islands Company

- Dwelling at 11 Mink Park for Glyndwr and Vanessa Valler

- Security fences around each communications tower base at Sapper Hill and at their office complex on Ross Road for Cable and Wireless

- Garage to be erected at 3a Brandon Road for Ricky Jones

- Porch erection at the house at 17 Davis Street for Ian McLeod (Snr)

- Change of use of a garden shed to a gun repair business at 4 Rowlands Rise for Nevin Middleton

- Dwelling at 7 Hebe Street for Lisa Jaffray

- Temporary siting of three 40-foot containers for storage of building material on land opposite 15 Sullivan Street for Allan Steen and Kerry McRae

- Change of use of land from public open space to domestic garden for Tim and Jane Cotter to the rear of 9 Jeremy Moore Avenue

- Single-storey kitchen extension to Shorty's Diner at West Hillside for Richard Short

- Works to sea defences, the construction of a breakwater and the construction of a rock wall over the sewer pipe at Seaview

Cottage on Ross Road East for Dick Sawle

- Extension to dwelling for Maurice Davis at 39 Davis Street

- Siting of a Portakabin office building and the installation of a bio-disc foul water drainage system at 5 FIPASS Road for Consolidated Fisheries Limited

- Parking of four transit minibuses during the tourist season, and until they are serviced at its conclusion, at 3 Davis Street East for Kevin and Hattie Kilmartin.

There were two objections to the granting of planning permission for a dwelling to be erected and provided with off-street parking on land to the rear of 29 Fitzroy Road and fronting Davis Street for Neville and Pauline Hayward. These were considered by members who decided to grant conditional approval for the development.

Two applications were for retrospective planning permission, the development having already been carried out. The first to be reviewed was for a container sited at 1 Sullivan Street and was submitted for Timmy Morrison who asked for consent to allow the building of a garage in two years'

time, but the committee gave approval for just one year.

The second was for an educational tourism facility building at Bluff Cove Farm on East Falkland, and the committee were pleased to grant planning permission to Kevin and Hattie Kilmartin.

Only one application had to be deferred: for permission in principle sought by Cantray Limited for the construction of a port and related logistics infrastructure at Port San Carlos, East Falkland.

The EPO explained that he required much more information than had been submitted and had now written to the applicants detailing what was needed.

There was the possibility, he added, that as in earlier cases there might be the need for the applicant to appear before the committee to further explain their proposals.

Building Adviser Nick Stephens briefly reported on two amendments to his list of applications for building permits he had been reviewing, three of which had now been approved.

The next meeting is on December 2 in the Liberation Room.

Dog handlers help out

MAYBE it's because they are naturally animal lovers, but when the members of the JSPSU dog handling unit at MPA heard about the need for a rehabilitation unit for oiled penguins, they just had to get involved.

After meetings with members of Falklands Conservation and the Agriculture Department, and enlisting military engineering colleagues, a plan for a new facility to be located at the Agricultural Department was drawn up.

A year of fundraising activities later, Flight Sergeant Dave Nellist, Corporal Chris Lall and, of course, Police Dog Hart came into Stanley on Friday to hand over a cheque for £6,000 to Falklands Conservation Chairman Darren Christie on behalf of their unit.

With more practical and logistical help from the military, the £25,000 facility, which will include a small pool and a tiled treatment area, could be ready as early as February 2011.

Surveying sea's secrets in depth

TWO marine biologists, Dr Claire Goodwin and Dr Emma Wells, have recently joined the Falklands based Shallow Marine Surveys Group to participate in scuba diving surveys.

Claire, a curator at National Museums Northern Ireland who specialises in sponges, is making her third trip to the Islands, after carrying out survey work at the Jason Islands in 2008 and Beauchêne and Sea Lion Islands in 2009.

"We have recently described 12 new species of sponge from the Jasons expedition," she said. "This trip is a great opportunity to survey some new areas and I'm sure there are many more discoveries to be made."

Emma is an independent consultant who specialises in sea-

weed. She visited the Falklands for the first time in March, keen to build on existing research.

"Although historic reports of seaweed diversity exist for the Falklands, these are scarce and hugely outdated," she said. "Already this study is revealing a number of previously unrecorded species. So far the work has been fun, exciting and important for Falklands biodiversity records."

After two weeks around Stanley, including surveys in Berkeley Sound and Port William, the scientists on Sunday will depart with the SMSG survey team on MV Pharos for a three-week survey of South Georgia.

Claire said: "I'm very excited to be visiting South Georgia as there is the possibility of seeing glass sponges in diving depths;

these normally only occur in very deep water."

The specimens collected on the expedition will be catalogued and taken back for the UK for closer examination, and eventually placed in museum collections. The scientists will also contribute to sponge and seaweed sections of local identification guides.

Dr Paul Brickley, Chairman of SMSG, said: "Seaweeds and sponges are difficult to identify without specialist training. Having these experts join our survey team will be a great help in our efforts to describe and quantify the sublittoral fauna and flora of these areas. We're very grateful to the Shackleton Scholarship Fund and Joint Nature Conservation Committee for providing financial support for the visits."

"I am very proud to have attended and represented the Falklands at this ceremony," he told the Penguin News.

"It makes me feel my 50 years of involvement with Falklands sport, since I was secretary of the football club in 1960, was worthwhile. It is nice to be recognised in this way."

Patrick was a finalist alongside Jamaican netballer and president of the International Federation of Netball Associations, Molly Rhone, and winner Susie Simecock, a New Zealand squash star.

"It was an interesting experience," said Patrick. "There were masses of well-known and famous sports people there."

Just at our table we had Mike McFarlane who won a 200m gold medal for England at the 1982 Commonwealth Games in Brisbane, Alvin Kallieheran who played cricket 66 times for the West Indies and 20 years for Warwickshire, and Jane "Jasper" Sixsmith who played hockey for Britain at several Olympics and won a bronze at the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona.

"I felt that although I received the award it was also an appreciation of the Falkland Islands' involvement in the Commonwealth Games since 1982.

"I hope it also would encourage other small countries within the Commonwealth Games Federation (CGF) to be prepared to nominate their athletes and administrators for the Commonwealth Sports Awards."

Mike Fennell, president of the CGF, told the audience at the International Convention Centre: "It is so important that we recognise the achievements of our Commonwealth athletes and there is so much to be proud of."

Patrick and his wife Sila were battling a flu bug during their visit, and he said: "I'm looking forward to coming back to the sunny Falklands and some fresh air. It's bitterly cold in this country."







Sand Bay Wind Farm breaking new records

WHILE maybe not as impressive as the off-shore wind farms in parts of Britain or the vast armies of turbines that seem to march across so much of the European landscape, the small number of elegant wind turbines that make up the Falkland Islands Sand Bay Wind Farm, and which visitors can see on the approach to Stanley from the Mount Pleasant airport, are making an international impact as they continue to set records.

Last week Stanley Power Station Manager Glenn Ross announced that this month the Sand Bay Wind Farm had produced 40 per cent of the total electricity required by Stanley.

Beating the previous high of 38 per cent achieved in August, the new record leaves trailing in our wake the UK Government's goal that 20 per cent of electricity produced in Britain should be renewable by 2020.

Small in number, but increasingly significant in terms of the percentage of the electricity requirement that they produce, the Sand Bay turbines also help to prove the Falkland Islands' commitment to the reduction of carbon emissions and the fight against global warming.

The Sand Bay Wind Farm produced 115,272 units of electricity at an hourly average for the week of 686 kilowatts.

The highest hourly output was 1200 kilowatts and the highest hourly percentage was 57 per cent.

Glenn Ross is quoted in some reports as saying that fuel displacement was 30,290 litres, which provides for an estimated weekly saving of £14,720.

The installation of the first three wind turbines in 2007 resulted in the displacement of 26 per cent of annual fuel consumption, according to Falklands Government reports at the time.

Governor of the Falkland Islands, Mr Nigel Haywood, told the Penguin News that he regarded the wind farm as providing "a practical local solution to a local problem."

The wind farm was not only very impressive in itself, but also demonstrated a commendably far-sighted approach to energy problems.

In this respect the Governor believed that the Falkland Islands was offering a valuable lesson for small communities elsewhere in the world.

Call to ditch Medical Services Tax

THE proposed Medical Services Tax Bill should be ditched, according to former long-serving councillor Mike Summers.

In a strongly worded letter to present members of the Legislative Assembly, Mr Summers says that the Bill, if passed, "will cause resentment from lower paid persons, cause yet more bureaucracy and paperwork for people trying to work and run their businesses, will throw up endless unfairnesses, will make no contribution whatsoever to the provision of medical

services, will probably stimulate demand for medical treatment overseas (on the grounds people see themselves as paying for it directly), will put increased pressure on medical staff."

Mr Summers argues that what was at first proposed as a "levy" should be treated as a tax, thus avoiding the requirement for new and inevitably complex legislation.

Creating new legislation, Mr Summers claims, would have the effect of making taxation policy

more complicated when the overall objective should be to keep it simple and understandable.

According to Mr Summers, the aim of achieving more funding for the health service could be better achieved by amendments to mainstream taxation, putting the burden on those who can best afford it, through a tried and tested system, rather than "taking money from people who cannot afford to pay additional taxes."

Councillor Gavin Short said that he and his colleagues were

grateful to Mr Summers for his input, which would be discussed at GPC next week.

According to Cllr Short, the Medical Services Levy, as he still hoped it would be called, was the most "popular" of any of the financial gap-bridging options that were brought to the Assembly, with the load spread between employer and employee. An increase in personal tax rates would only affect the employee, he said, which was something he would find "a little hard to swallow."

Fisheries scientist Vlad discovers new squid

DR Vladimir Laptikhovskiy of the Falkland Islands Government Fisheries Department has discovered a new species of squid this week, while taking part in an international workshop in South Africa.

The purpose of the workshop, held at the South African Institute for Aquatic Biodiversity (SAIAB), was to identify more than 7,000 specimens collected during a cruise in the Indian Ocean. Dr Laptikhovskiy (Vlad Laptop to his friends) did not take part in the cruise but was invited to assist in the identification workshop.

The cruise and the workshop were part of the Seamount Project, the overall objective of which is to develop ecosystem-based approaches to fisheries management for areas of significant biological and commercial importance (ie seamounts) located in areas beyond national jurisdiction, like the high seas. The project aims to address the three main barriers to

sustainable fisheries management and marine biodiversity conservation in the high seas: lack of scientific knowledge about seamount ecosystems and their relationship with fisheries resources, lack of comprehensive and effective governance frameworks for marine biodiversity in the high seas, and the difficulty of managing offshore fish stocks, including monitoring, control and surveillance.


Richard's art group started in about 2001 at the request of the "Lifelong Learning" scheme.

Military's rogue flight exercise broadcast live

WHILE it is not unknown for Argentine military aircraft to test the alertness of British forces defending the Falkland Islands by flying close to the edges of our air space, it seemed on Monday as if an attempt was being made by an Argentine civilian in a single passenger aircraft.

At about 12.30pm, while idly scanning the airwaves on the 2m band, Fox Bay resident Nuala McKay tuned into a series of messages apparently coming from military sources and directed towards an unknown pilot in a small plane heading towards Falklands air space.

Though crackle and poor reception made for difficult listening, such phrases as "turn away, turn away; not permitted, we repeat, not permitted" and "if you con-

tinue on this course we will regard you as a threat" came through loud and clear with an only too obvious meaning, particularly when another voice in response said: "This is a single-engined aircraft with one person aboard and I am exercising my right to fly over our land."

Such messages went on for more than a quarter of an hour, increasing in intensity as the aircraft addressed had obviously by now entered the 200-mile exclusion zone and was being asked to leave. By 12.45pm, when the unknown aircraft was being warned that its actions were illegal, Nuala had contacted the Penguin News who in turn contacted the tower at Stanley Airport.

They had heard nothing about such a flight. Initial attempts to raise someone at Mount Pleasant

to explain what was going on failed, but the Penguin News then contacted Government House to be given the reassuring news that what Nuala had tuned into was in fact a military "desktop" exercise, designed to test communication systems.

Later - perhaps too late to tranquilise the nerves of anyone else who had accidentally tuned into these exchanges - the Penguin News received this notification from the MoD: "HQ BFSAI and FIG departments are currently undertaking a number of exercises to test internal communications equipment and processes. Should residents hear anything unusual on the radio waves there is no need to be alarmed - the scenarios are all part of the exercise plan."

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

THE feedback on allowing only one large cruise ship on any one day has been interesting, ranging from "it will never happen" to "we are nearly there."

Another argument in favour is that, in the case of weather cancellations, FIG would lose only one set of harbour dues and landing fees with a fair chance that the second ship would get in the next day.

I KNOW some question why we continue marking Armistice Day when the last surviving veterans of WW1 have died.

I believe it important to learn from history and to commemorate the lives lost in all subsequent wars.

As long as the commemoration is dignified and respectful it can only reinforce our respect for those willing to fight for freedom.

ONE of my tasks this week is to outline the political structure of the Islands to newly recruited civil servants at their induction day. One thing that often surprises me is that some civil servants, and not just the newly appointed, imagine that they are not permitted to express opinions on political matters.

I have traced some of this to the fact that I believe they were advised at election time that they should not be seen to be publicly supporting individual candidates.


This is a proper and appropriate democratic safeguard.

However, as long as they are not in conflict with their own role, seen to be critical of their own department (there are other routes for that), or of policies on which they have advised, I believe civil servants in general are free to express political views.

If not, we would in effect be disenfranchising more than 500 people representing a high percentage of the electorate.

The management code is thought overly complex and parts are being reviewed, but I would hate to think that it impinged on individuals' democratic rights to the extent that they feel gagged.

Likewise, I hope that the protection for "whistle blowers" who can substantiate a genuine concern or grievance is sufficient to ensure that they will not feel at risk of unpleasant repercussions if they make a complaint.

A hearty day at sea

THE pride of the South Atlantic defence force hosted almost 90 Falklands guests for a day at sea on Friday.

Are the words of MLAs matching their deeds?

One year after their election, some members of the "all change" Falkland Islands Legislative Assembly have been accused of failing to live up to their pre-electoral promises. John Fowler considers whether such criticism is justified...

WITHOUT the backing of a political party to guide them, election candidates in the Falklands are free to let loose whatever personal bees they may have in their bonnets.

However, we have chosen to examine how their words and performance matched up, starting with the area which was of most obvious concern to the electorate.

Last year in the Falklands there was a general feeling of a lack of connection and communication between people and government, which was increasingly seen to be in thrall to a largely expatriate civil service and not representative of the views of Falkland Islanders.

The reshuffle of the civil service into eight departments under eight superheads was regarded by many as the supreme proof of this tendency, and decried by some of the successful candidates.

The question has to be what, if anything, did they do about it once elected?

Returning to the political fray after several years of absence, Cllr Sharon Halford had this to say about government: "Instead of leading by example and taking the greatest cuts, the staffing levels and remuneration of government appear to be spiralling out of control. Who said the computer revolution would reduce the number of workers!


"To me FIG is like a tree with branches spreading everywhere, some of which are getting well overgrown. This tree needs a thorough and good pruning, without which it is likely to topple over through sheer weight of management.

"One branch is FIDC and I question its affordability in the current climate. I feel it has run its course and should be phased out."

Questioned this week by Penguin News, Cllr Halford said that she was now in favour of FIDC being "pruned, but not totally cut out."

It was her hope that the current review of FIDC would result in it being relieved of some of the "rubbish" which government had tended to dump upon it and allowed to be "more of what it should be."

Veteran returnee to the councillors' ranks, Bill Luxton was also well-known for his negative feelings about FIDC. But recently he

went on FIRS to say that he too had changed his mind.

Changing one's mind in the face of evidence is normally a good thing, but maybe not if one is a politician, elected on the basis of one set of views, which are promptly abandoned thereafter.

Perhaps predictably, as representative of the General Workers' Union, election candidate Gavin Short called for "a complete review of the FIG by councillors" and for all contract posts to be examined by them.

Meanwhile, Roger Edwards wrote in the Penguin News of the need to "change negatives into positives by cutting expensive posts and departments no longer fit for purpose."

Daughter and fellow candidate Emma Edwards spoke of a "dictatorship style" of government, stating that she did not "believe the superheads are the right way forward, nor performance related pay for the Civil Service."

While being, as usual, more measured and moderate in her choice of words in her election manifesto, Jan Cheek spoke of areas in the government restructure which were "anomalous or not adequately explained by the outgoing members" to whom, rather than the Chief Executive, she subtly ascribed responsibility.

Mrs Cheek also found difficulty in believing that the creation of an extra layer of bureaucracy could result in a £200,000 saving, regretted the loss of corporate memory in the Secretariat and criticised the notion that one person could effectively run both the Health and Education Departments.

So what has happened in the past 12 months to trim the spreading FIG tree, apart from the previously mentioned review of FIDC, being carried out not by councillors, but by... wait for it... FIDC? Cllr Sawle has made much of the

fact that two senior government posts were "cut," but this was seen by most simply as a face-saving exercise.

The post of Executive Manager had never previously existed and, perhaps, the only one to notice its passing was the unfortunate Steve Dent, who was appointed and then "dis-appointed" before he had even had a chance to warm his office chair.

The Senior Projects Manager post was vacated and remains unfilled, but this was no surprise as the chief responsibility of the post holder was to supervise the development of a new port when, after several years of debate, its location, value and affordability were still undecided.

Having stated in the Penguin News a year ago that he would "want to see raised morale back in the Civil Service so that it is optimistic and once again works together as a team," many voters will have been surprised and disappointed by Cllr Sawle's public support for the Chief Executive, the man previously seen by some of his colleagues, and a large part of the electorate, as being personally responsible for this lack of morale.

The question here is whether Mr Thorogood was simply the obedient servant of the previous Assembly – a defence which did not go down well at Nuremberg incidentally – or their puppeteer?

Those of us who believe, perhaps naively, that it is the job of the Legislative Assembly to decide policy and the job of the administration to carry it out, may worry whether the latter proposition still holds true, and will have been alarmed by Cllr Sawle's recent complaint "that within FIG there are very few people at the top to push progress forwards."

This, to many, will sound too much as if he wants the tail to wag the dog!

Britain's slow military decline

YOUR may be aware that in 1982 the subsonic RAF Harrier was unproven and due to politically driven economy measures it was found wanting. The Sea Harrier was retired in 2006.

We were lucky indeed during the Falklands conflict, and I think most historians have concluded that it may well have been just as predictable for the "Tin-Pot General" and the "Iron Lady" to have sat down and flicked a coin to determine stewardship of these Islands.

I do not wish to detract from the job that Harriers did, but militarily it could easily have gone the other way. The UK sold the Harrier to Spain and Italy.

Australia and, yes, Argentina, were hoped for markets but declined; as was China, but we withdrew the offer after they invaded Vietnam.

The MOD "Del Boys" are now trying to sell our Harrier fleet to India, but Obama may pip us to the post. The Indian Chief of the Air Staff in Raj-speak describes the Harrier as "Iffy!"

Arms procurement is a shady business and the British Government has perhaps scrapped the Harrier as it was always feebly supported, rather like the Spitfire some years before.

Both illustrate the decline of our aerospace industry with the defence cuts of 1957 being particularly savage.

Fortunately the concept was taken overseas and modified for the US Marine Corp, but even there it is called the "widow-maker."

Now we have evolved to the Joint Combat Aircraft which the cash strapped UK is yet to acquire. As a nation we'd rather pay for Dame Rooney's antics or text Strictly Come Dancing rather than properly fund defence.

Occasionally we will have a celebrity endorsed charity bash to provide troops with the care or kit the British Government should provide.

It seems we prefer to dole out benefits to British citizens like Abu Hamza which is more morally twee than providing effective kit for our dwindling troops.

As Colonel Tim Collins commented: "For the British Forces today, we choose to run at the back with the fat boys!"

Once we become a non-nuclear power, India may well get our place on the UN Security Council. They don't have much love for Britain's colonial legacy, so maybe we should be concerned as they will note the Nootka Sound Con-

vention of 1790 signed by Britain and Spain (specifically Article VI, Google it!).

I understand why politicians ridicule Admiral Woodward's recent comments on the latest defence cuts, but they rarely have to risk their lives. In fact, few politicians today have any military service at all, and the nearest many of our parliamentarians have come to combat is avoiding the constables whilst manoeuvring on Hampstead Heath.

Roy Davis (Penguin News, November 5) is quite correct to point out the merit of the superb Lightning, retained until 1988 to catch the Soviet "Backfire," but also knows it had a flying time of only 30-plus minutes and just two shots with a dodgy British missile.

It was also a bonus for the pilot to be shorter than Ronnie Corbett or else he became a bilateral above-knee amputee on ejection and, interestingly, the only aircraft it ever shot down was a RAF Harrier!

The Phantom in its American form was a good all-purpose aircraft and the Israelis used it with devastating effect. But again, the UK government degraded the aircraft by requiring 40 per cent to be made in Britain.

The engine and avionics changes to operate off small carriers hamstrung the aircraft with RN and RAF requirements often different.

For top speed and altitude the American Phantom was better. If inept management, slow development, political infighting and in-

ter-service rivalry had been avoided, we could have had the TSR2, but we can no longer afford such kit.

Thus equipped, the RAF may have had far more success with the Black Buck sorties to deny the Argentines the use of Stanley airfield.

The Phantom, being primarily designed as an all-weather fleet defence interceptor, could also fly off carriers, but in 1982 the British didn't actually have any.

The last real flight from a British carrier was in 1978. HMS Invincible was a through deck cruiser, the term "carrier" being non-PC and HMS Hermes a WW2 antique that was then a helicopter transporter.

We didn't have any airborne early warning radar either. In fact, looking back, we didn't have very much at all.

I do still have my DMS boots, though: well, I have the uppers but the soles are lying about somewhere on the Salisbury plain. I also have my Boer War issue puttees. They frightened the Argies.

HQ BFSAI advises that the latest defence cuts herald "a new strategic approach, based on rigorous risk management and conflict prevention."

The British HQ boasted that in Singapore (1942), and we were defeated by a Japanese force a fraction of the size in seven days.

Soon I fear our defence will consist of a big white flag and Ann Widcombe!

Achievements are sadly lacking

Nothing in politics is an achievement until it is done, and of the list of 48 at least 13 are not completed, and several nowhere near it – immigration policy, museum relocation, research institute, MPA wind farm, FIDC review, port development, and the last five on the list which are anyway only internal Government administration. A further nine were put in place by his predecessors and required little or no further policy action, including Mink Park and East Stanley (where are the new housing developments), PAC, Queen's Award, TV and radio improvements, A Newman as regu-

lator, webpage production in GH: 26.

Seven are simply routine business – the budget, including subventions and tax measures, HR issues, drilling permits, PRP applications, international meetings (in which area there has been nothing new and a good deal of self-praise): 19.

One, the setting up of a local TV station is a private sector initiative and little to do with the government.

Eight are all to do with the regulation of C&W – not yet achieved. Down to ten.

Improved consultation is a matter of individual perception, but there are no new formal consultation processes, and not even a presentation of the budget for the public to discuss.

A number of claims of increased transparency have been made (though not in Dick's article).

I am all for that, but see no evidence. What is it and how is it measured?

So, in reality, less than one achievement per month of government. That's probably why most respondents thought there was not much going on.

Reasons to be eggs-tra cautious

FURTHER to the comments from Hamish Wylie about eggs from Brazil being date stamped, I would like to point out that I have no problem with this practice and think it is a very good idea.

The reason for being cautious about importing eggs from Brazil is not to do with the freshness of the eggs (although the fresher, the better) but is to do with not importing any potentially dangerous avian diseases into the Falkland Islands, in particular highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI).

The virus that causes this disease can be found on both the external surface of the egg and internally.

It is common practice in the Falkland Islands (as elsewhere) to feed kitchen scraps to backyard hens, and these scraps could include egg shells and parts of uneaten eggs.

The bird population in the Falkland Islands, both domestic and wild, has almost certainly never encountered HPAI and the

consequences of the disease entering the Islands would be devastating to both categories of birds.

With the wild bird population being such an important factor in enticing tourists to visit these Islands, I think waiting for a further month or two to be certain that Brazilian eggs are not going to cause a problem is a small price to pay for any perceived inconvenience.

Points of Law

Staff from the Attorney General's Chambers present key aspects of existing Employment Protection Legislation. This week they look at termination of employment and redundancy

SECTION 47 of the Employment Protection Ordinance (EPO) gives employers and employees the right to notice of termination of employment. Employers must give at least:

1. one week's notice if the employee has been employed for less than two years
2. one week's notice per year of employment if the employee has been employed for more than two but less than 12 years
3. 12 weeks' notice if the employee has been employed for more than 12 years

An employee who has been employed for one month or more must give at least one week's notice if they wish to leave.

Either party can waive their right to notice from the other party, accept a payment in lieu of notice, or terminate the employment without notice where this is justified by the other party's conduct. Employees are entitled to their usual rate of pay during the notice period (unless they are on strike).

An employer must provide a written statement of reasons for dismissal on request, provided the employee has been continuously employed for six months (section 51 EPO). A complaint may be made to the Summary Court if a statement is not produced.

Section 79 EPO gives an employee who is dismissed by reason of redundancy a right to a redundancy payment from their employer, provided they have been continuously employed for two years. The amount is calculated in accordance with Schedule 3 EPO and depends on the length of continuous employment and the employee's age. Dismissal will be regarded as being due to redundancy if the employer has ceased to carry on the business for which the employee was employed, has relocated the business, or if the need for that job to be carried out no longer exists.

Section 80 EPO excludes redundancy payments to:

1. men over the age of 65
2. women over the age of 60
3. employees dismissed on ground of their conduct
4. employees who refuse an offer from the employer of suitable alternative employment

Any questions regarding redundancy pay are to be referred to and determined by the Summary Court.

Accidental death verdict recorded

A VERDICT of accidental death was recorded in the Coroner's Court last Friday in the case of former FIG Government Archivist Jane Cameron.

Her Majesty's Coroner John Trevaskis said the case was unusual due to the lack of documentation.

However, he accepted the report of Coroner's Officer Detective Sergeant David Street of the

Royal Falkland Islands Police that Miss Cameron, 59 years, had died in the Clinica San Miguel in Trelew, Argentina on December 26 last year as a result of extensive injuries sustained when a car in which she was a passenger was involved in a collision with a lorry on November 12.

The court was told by Detective Sergeant Street that Miss Cameron was in Argentina at the

invitation of a Dutch television company. She was to appear in and give assistance with the making of a programme about Charles Darwin's celebrated voyage on HMS Beagle.

The cause of death was recorded as being due to septic shock and multiple organ failure.

Mr Trevaskis offered his condolences to the family and many friends of Jane Cameron.

Matthew on course for historic boat race

MATTHEW Pointing, son of FIG's Senior Veterinary Officer, Steve Pointing, may get to take part in one of the world's oldest and most famous sporting events.

The former Falkland Islands Community School student is included among the 22 rowers forming the squad from which the Oxford University eight will be chosen for next year's Oxford and Cambridge race to be held in March on the River Thames.

Since 2007 he has been a student at St Anne's College Oxford where he is following a four-year degree course in earth sciences.

Matthew, 22, is a member of the Oxford University Boat Club's development squad and was a triallist in 2009.

Before leaving the Falklands to go to Peter Symonds College in Winchester he had regularly represented the Falkland Islands as a swimmer at the Small Island Games.

Matthew plays badminton and hockey at club level and holds a purple belt in karate.

Having made the squad, Matthew will now undergo a gruelling programme of daily training and racing before the final crew will be announced some four weeks before the actual race day.

If not chosen for the final team, he will still have a chance to take part in the Isis versus Golding reserve team race on the same course.

The Boat Race, which dates from 1829, is one of the most popular events in the British sporting calendar.

The traditional rivalry between the blue of Oxford and the light blue of Cambridge attracts a massive crowd of around 250,000 to the banks of the River Thames between Putney and Mortlake, and an estimated global TV audience of over 120 million.

The 2011 Boat race will be the 156th in the series which last year's winners Cambridge lead by 80 to Oxford's 75.

LAST Sunday marked remembrance with a memorial Service in the Cathedral and a march to the Cross of Sacrifice monument to lay wreaths.



The Sapper Hill Memorial was built in memory of those soldiers of the Corps of Royal Engineers killed during the Falklands War, and the service remembered all other Engineers who died in theatre.

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Couple bid a fond farewell

A COUPLE who clearly believe in showing their Christian faith in deeds rather than words left the Falklands last week.

Popular Seamen's Mission managers Maurice and Debbie Lake, who the Penguin News caught up with last Friday anxiously hoping that their intended airbridge flight would come in despite the appalling weather conditions, will soon be facing new challenges.

After four years looking after the material, social and spiritual needs of fishermen from Spain, Chile, Peru and Asia, and serving wholesome food to the local community, 2011 will see them catering in a very different situation as Superintendents of the Royal National Mission to Seamen in Kilkeel, Northern Ireland, mainly looking after the prawn fishing fleet.

Kilkeel is located at the foot of the Mourne Mountains on the South East coast of County Down, about 20 miles north of Newry City. The seamen's mission there

is the only one in either Northern Island or the Republic of Ireland, so Maurice says an awful lot of driving may be involved.

Maurice and Debbie are taking over the mission from Alex and Trish Slater, who have both been to the Falkland. Alex, with 45 years of service, is the National Mission to Seamen's longest serving superintendent.


The posting to the Falklands was the first for Maurice and Debbie, who were married shortly before arriving here. Previously both had worked for the mental health organisation, MIND. Both recognise that without their service in the Falklands they would not have been ready for their new challenge: "We have a lot to thank the Falklands for," said Maurice.

Debbie described the people of the Falklands as having been the best thing about being here: "They are absolutely fabulous," she said, adding that working with and within the fishing community in the Falklands had been "great."

Surf's up for body boarders

THE first wave I stood on left me wondering why I hadn't discovered this sooner - one gulp and eye socket swallowing of seawater later I launched back on the board for more.

Surfing is taking off all over the world and, for a handful of followers, Surf Bay is name and purpose. "Kelp far offshore knocks some of the power out of the waves making them more manageable," Sam Cockwell explained.

He was 17 when he took up surfing and, having established his interest for water sports, he turned his focus to body boarding.

"I was fit enough to surf but balance doesn't come naturally and I didn't have enough time to practice," he said. "I was reluctant to try body boarding at first but, once I picked up the technique, I discovered I could catch more waves." The shorter, more ma-

noeuverable board is also easier for pulling tricks on. Sam believes the waves of Surf Bay seem suited to body boards: "The nature of the shelf creates a catchment of quite steep waves, good for small or medium sized boards."

On the surfing side longer boards are generally considered easier to get stability, ideal for beginners, but more suited to bays with a long sandy inclines from the sea. For people intrigued by water sports, body boarding is a good start. But it is important not to venture out to the sea alone, especially with no coast lifeguard here. It's also essential to be able to swim with knowledge of sea temperament.

Good preparation is key if you're serious about wanting to start boarding of any type. You will need the right equipment and at least some basic lessons. A full neoprene wet-suit with hood, booties and gloves may not be fashionable but will give you a lot more time in the water.



Head resigns: now FICS braced for Ofsted report

FEARS have been expressed that the suspension and later resignation of the Community School's head teacher may have impacted negatively on last week's inspection by Christopher Spencer of the Forces Schools Service.

Acting Director of Education Richard Fogerty said news of the resignation of Alastair Baldwin was "a sad situation, but one which provided opportunities for building on in the future."

It is widely believed that Mr Baldwin's resignation was connected with his recent suspension from duty, while certain allegations against him were being investigated.

Mr Fogerty declined to confirm or deny any link, saying that Mr Baldwin's resignation was a matter between him, the Chief Executive and the Human Resources Department.

In response to questions from the Penguin News about both the circumstances leading to Mr Baldwin's resignation and the financial conditions surrounding it, Acting Chief Executive Keith Padgett said that it would be inappropriate for him to make any comment beyond what was contained in the official government statement.

The statement, issued on Wednesday, said: "On 23rd November 2010, Mr Alastair Baldwin informed FIG management that he wished to conclude his appointment as Headmaster of the Falkland Islands Community School."

"Mr Baldwin's decision has been accepted by FIG, and as a result FIG will now be making the recruitment of a new head teacher one of its key priorities, as it is firmly committed to ensuring the school continues to grow in strength and stature over the coming years.

"Mrs Helen Bell will take on the role of Acting Head Teacher in the intervening period between Mr

Baldwin's departure and the appointment of his successor."

Some parents of students at the school revealed a surprising lack of concern about the allegations made against Mr Baldwin, although at least one thought that the allegations, if true, were at odds with what she called his "holier than thou" attitude when talking to children in trouble and their parents.

One parent also hoped that Mr Baldwin's resignation would not

cause any further investigation into the allegations to be dropped.

Questioned about Mr Baldwin's leadership of the school, one parent said she thought Mr Baldwin's departure was a shame because he had been "good for the school."

Another said: "He seemed to be OK; at least nothing seemed to get any worse when he was there, although there wasn't any vast improvement either." However, such a degree of even faint ap-

proval for their former head teacher seems unlikely to be found at the Community School, where morale among some teachers is understood to have been low for some time.

Like all Forces Schools inspectors, Mr Spencer belongs to the Office for Standards in Education, Children's Services and Skills (Ofsted), which in Britain carries out hundreds of school inspections every week, according to strict guidelines.

Ofsted inspections are described on its website as involving dialogue with senior managers in the school as a central part, with the school's own self-evaluation providing the starting point for inspectors, and with the views of pupils, parents and other stakeholders being taken into account. Inspections result in a written report indicating one of four grades: outstanding, good, satisfactory or inadequate.

The school was put on notice to improve after a somewhat damning Ofsted report four years ago. Mr Baldwin arrived in the Islands in 2007 and, one year later a Review of Progress painted a highly favourable picture of the school.

The FIG website reported: "Successful progress has been made in the areas of safeguarding pupils; teaching and learning; leadership and management and good progress with considerable improvement has been made in the behaviour of students, with incidences of bullying not raised as an issue by students."

The Education Department has told the Penguin News that the early drafts of the inspection report are currently being examined, but that the report will be made public at the "earliest opportunity."

Mr Baldwin was unavailable for comment.

MINDFUL of the fact that a decent amount of time has passed since I was last let loose on this column (five years in fact) I think I can be just about excused for raking up the one subject that leaves me incandescent with righteous fury.

Before those who know me groan resignedly and correctly anticipate a rant about vehicle driving testosterone-fuelled fools tearing up areas of natural beauty, at the very least, if you care for the environment or even local tourism, perhaps you might indulge me for a moment.

My concern is Cape Pembroke. The track to the lighthouse is widening at a frightening rate, and vehicles are being driven over sand dunes, ripping them apart. I have witnessed groups of up to ten motorcyclists zipping around the Cape without regard for vegetation or nesting birds. I have seen beer cans that have been thrown out of windows and ditches on Penguin Walk chewed up from boggings.

Sadly, the crude rock road under construction towards the lighthouse is both environmentally unfriendly and an eyesore, and makes it that little bit easier for the mud-trackers to access the area.

Almost as bad (and perhaps worse in terms of the local economy) bikes have even been seen on the vulnerable footpath around the shore from the Lady Liz to Hadassa Bay and Gypsy Cove. It is here that our tour operators conduct nature treks for visiting cruise ship visitors, and where dedicated individuals have taken the time to create simple walk ways across small ditches, not only to help out the tourists but to assist those who love to ramble, walk their dogs or even run around that peaceful and pretty area.

Why is this allowed to continue? There is so much land available for mud-tracking and, while an acceptable pastime in itself, why do we have to view the grotty, ugly evidence so close to home? Surely it must be possible to protect these few small areas?

Do we not value our environment? Why should we eventually have to travel far afield in search of relatively pristine areas? What about our visitors? We want their cash, don't we? Does it not follow that we offer something attractive and cared for in return? We have nature and beauty on our doorstep; let's not screw it up.

To ignore the problem is not only apathetic but, to be perfectly blunt, downright stupid. Nature in charge? Let's make it a mission statement – not a joke.

Container park costs to top £1m

THE cost of constructing the container park at FIPASS has ballooned out to £1,115,000.

The Public Works Department is still trying to finalise what resources are needed to complete the works, but it looks certain that an additional £170,000 will be needed on top of the originally allocated £945,000.

The project was to be funded by capital funding allocation, and partly by self-funding, although the new money source is a decision "yet to be made," according to Director of Public Works Manfred Keenleyside.

Councillor Dick Sawle emphasised at Tuesday's public meeting that the container park was not exclusively for SAAS use, who will manage it, but it was an investment for the future of fisheries as well with the hope that ves-

sels use the storage space. Costs for the Port Howard Terminal were also underestimated, with an additional £250,000 required, forcing the total costs to £1,336,000.

"There have been areas of cost over which it has not been possible to effect control," said Mr Keenleyside.

He blamed the lost South American shipping link for increasing material costs.

Additional problems were increased private sector plant hire rates, labour costs and the increased cost distribution of overheads when the estimate was prepared, a "side effect of the Abattoir works not being done by MFL," Mr Keenleyside reported in answer to a question put to councillors.

He said the works looked likely to be completed on schedule.

Sentencing adjourned

KYLE Joshua (21) of Stanley admitted driving with excess alcohol appearing before the Senior Magistrate's Court on Wednesday.

Mr Joshua had attempted to turn around on the Airport Road on November 14 when his Mitsubishi Shogun overturned.

Sentencing for this and a previous assault charge will take place on December 9. An interim disqualification from driving was issued until that date.

Claudio Briones Sepulveda (48) of Stanley on Wednesday ad-

mitted two charges of assault, between October 31 and November 1. Mr Briones Sepulveda also was in breach of a 12 month discharge for a previous assault on the same victim in August.

Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis said there seemed to be "a developing pattern of violence in this relationship. Unconditional bail was at the request of the complainant and this seems unusual."

A pre-sentence report was ordered, and sentence adjourned to February 2.

Oil intentions off-shore

A LETTER of intent has been signed by Greek company DryShips Inc that would see the Eirik Raude drill offshore in the Falklands.

The outlined \$77m contract would be for two wells and run for 90 days, with an option for three further wells that could extend the contract by 135 days. Drilling would be due to start in

October 2011 after its current contract in West Africa. George Economou, Chairman and CEO of DryShips Inc said they saw strong demand for the two rigs and were confident that their capacity in 2011 would secure employment at "attractive rates." According to the Borders and Southern website, more details would be provided on signature of the contract.

How war inspired hope in the eyes of a child

Sharp-eyed visitors to the museum will know from a letter exhibited there that when the Argentines invaded the Falklands, a young Lisa Watson's first impulse was to write to her grandmother in England to tell her all about it. Over the years that impulse to tell people about the occupation has obviously stayed with Lisa, whose book "Waking up to War" is launched this evening at the Victoria and Alex boutique in John Street. Sharon Jaffray goes between the covers...

ALTHOUGH I've devoured countless novels from Enid Blyton to John Grisham over the years, never have so few words evoked so many memories and emotions as Lisa's latest missive, *Waking Up To War*.

Her view, through the eyes of an 11-year-old, of the way of life and the uncertainties leading up to and during the Falklands War had me snuffling into a tissue as I recalled a precious and distant life-style, as well as laughing out loud at the childish antics before I'd turned the page.

Written in a simple style so as to appeal to children of a similar age Lisa was when the events took place, the 40-page book is not only a story of the fears, anger and guilt

of a child, but also an excellent social history.

We have had every military aspect of the Falklands War analysed and published, and Graham Bound did a great job with his book *Falkland Islanders at War*.

But never has the subject been looked at through the eyes of a child.

While *Waking Up to War* will be read predominantly by younger children – and I sincerely hope it becomes part of the school curriculum – the book will also be enjoyed by adults; not only those who have met the Long Island Watson family, but also those who wonder just what it is exactly Is-

landers find so special about the Falklands. Lisa says the Falklands War gave her the gift of optimism.

She had just assumed that the country would be saved by a protective power, a naïve assumption which was duly rewarded.

As an adult she knows that things could have been very different and recognises that she was a very lucky little girl. And now, as the mother of 17-year-old Jacob, the enormity of what was sacrificed to restore the complete freedom she so enjoyed as a child, has become even more apparent.

Many of the soldiers who fought on both sides were not much older than him.

Her story, she says, is also intended to convey in some small way her gratitude to the war veterans and to the families of those who died for the Falklands cause.

FIMCO Season

Open Day

The Agricultural Department will hold an open day at Saladero on Wednesday December 1.

Andrew Pollard, who returned to the Islands in November, will be the keynote speaker talking about what he has gleaned from his time in New Zealand in relation to improving yields and consistency of brassica, oats and improved pastures under acid peat soils.

Safe arrival of samples

Samples of faeces from all the dogs on the Islands, which were needed for the hydatid eradication trials and collected with the help

of DOA staff, have arrived safely at the laboratory in Salford UK.

National Stud Flock

The National Stud Flock (NSF) sheep have come through the winter generally in good body condition and lambing has produced in excess of 69 pairs of twins.

Better wool

Excellent quality, very white wool with strong tensile strength (unlike last year's tender clip) was shorn from the NSF Polwarth flock in October. Three outstanding fleeces have been kept to be entered in the Fox Bay fleece show in December.

Post holes to be filled

Ian and Susan Campbell return to Australia on January 29 and Tony Mills finishes up in June 2011. Some applications have been received for the Agricultural Advisor posts from experienced, practical applicants from New Zealand and Australia.

Interviews for the Agricultural Advisor Sheep and Agronomy will take place shortly.


THE inspection report should be available in time for the mid December Executive Council meeting and for early release thereafter. I look forward to receiving the inspector's recommendations.

Spinning started at 9am and, shortly afterwards, the first bobbins were plied for the loom.

Margo Smallwood and Jackie Adams wove the garment in shifts and, two hours in, the shawl was 92cm long.

The garment was finished in four hours 59 minutes, and before

cleaning it measured 61cm wide by 177cm long. After washing and rolling it had shrunk to 57cm by 163cm.

Mrs Smallwood told the Penguin News: "It's a practice run really. We had spun some wool for today already and put it on the loom last night. We'd like to do the whole thing from scratch in the future."

"The idea came about from our last AGM. We don't have enough members to hold a competition and we needed to show what we're all about."

But members are unsure what to do with the shawl: "We hoped to donate it as a raffle prize but we know that we want to leave it as it is," said Mrs Adams-Leach.

Stamp of approval for new national collection

CHAIRMAN of the Museum Trust Tim Blake accepted the donation of the completed 1878-1999 Falkland Islands National Stamp Collection on Tuesday with the promise: "This is a magnificent gift we will continue to treasure. Keep it up to date and maybe in 100 years time future generations can see it's still an absolute set."

The collection was first presented at Falkland House in London on November 4 to Sukey Cameron, who travelled to present the works to the Museum and National Trust.

The list of contributors is long, but special mention went to Stefan Heijtz whose idea it was for putting it together. He also thanked Dr John Henshaw for providing many of the rarer stamps and Stanley Gibbons for the "jewel in the crown," the 2½d overstamp on the 2d stamp and the £1 1933 centenary stamp, without which the collection would not be complete.

The collection has an estimated value of £7,000-8,000, although the most valuable stamps are in the early pages. It contains mint-condition issues but no "oddities," the name given to the most sought-after stamps printed with errors.

The stamps are considered an important educational tool, depicting art and heritage with issues by commissioned local artists and events of national and international importance.

Mr Blake said his favourites were the bird issue of 1962 and ship issues that followed: "That's a major part of our history as the ships carried our mail," he said.

"The whole thing is a work to be continued. What we need to do now is find the pages to keep it flowing."

The Falkland Islands Philatelic Bureau will continuously donate collections as they are released to

keep the collection up to date. Leona Vidal Roberts, Museum Manager told the Penguin News: "We are enormously fortunate to receive this donation as well as the promise from the post office.

"In an ideal world we would love to show the whole thing but it would fill up all our shelves. We

do hope to use originals or copies to add to our exhibitions and illustrate our displays.

Mr Heijtz contacted the Museum who explained that no funds were available to purchase a collection, so he offered to donate one.

Falklands faces feature in new exhibition by pioneering artist

STARK images of familiar Falklands faces form the centre piece of a captivating exhibition which opened in London yesterday.


Chilean artist Carlos Zuniga spent ten days in the Islands during August, photographing individuals and landscapes for his latest work, entitled *Imperial Poem*.

Zuniga, 38, one of the most celebrated artists in Chile, has created vivid portraits of Falklands residents - meticulously embedded into the pages from an Argentine phone book.

Employing a style he pioneered four years ago, in which he manually erases text line by line, the results are designed to serve as the basis for a "probing examination of issues surrounding censorship, identity and collective consciousness."

The exhibition notes say the works "resonate with a quiet calm and haunting ambiguity, opening a subtly intrusive inquiry into national identity and history's resonance in the Islands' communities."

"Visually wholly consuming, Zuniga's non-violent images resurface the turbulent history suffered by the Falkland Islands. Without reaching foregone conclusions, the

works highlight Argentina's continuing claims to sovereignty over the Falklands, recalling a conflict consigned to history, a territory now overlooked and a people almost forgotten."

Zuniga studied architecture at Andres Bello National University, followed by design at the Professional Institute of Providencia, and fine art at the University of Chile.

His work has featured in several major exhibitions at the Contemporary Art Museum of Santiago and the Visual Arts Museum of Santiago, and in 2007 he was awarded the Grant Fondart by the

Chilean Ministry of Culture, as well as the Bicentenary Young Artist Exhibition Prize in Santiago.

In the preface to his project, Zuniga writes: "I have not created images of war; however, I have created images of the landscape of the Islands."

"The horror of war, abuse and fear are all underlying, encrypted to a secondary awareness."

Imperial Poem is now on display at the Edel Assanti Project Space in Vauxhall Bridge Road, London, and runs until January 8.

'Quiet and mannerly' Falklands shearers could be world beaters

SHEARING expert Doug Lambie reckons that the Falkland Islands could produce some future world champions.

Speaking to the Penguin News towards the end of his three week visit to the Falkland Islands, during which he had the opportunity to tutor nearly all the Islands' shearers, the globally respected shearing tutor said local shearers were already becoming recognised as a threat to the supremacy of New Zealanders, Australians and other recognised shearing nations in international competition.

Doug, who hails originally from Oban in Scotland, but now farms in North Wales, says that he first became aware of the potential of Falkland Island shearers when he came here as a contract shearer in the summer of 1987/8.

Now, after 15 years as a shearing trainer for the British Wool Marketing Board, Doug has also served as what he describes as a "neutral instructor" at a number of world shearing championships, where his services can be taken up by any team requiring some last minute fine-tuning.

It was while exercising this coaching role at the World Shearing Championships in Norway in 2008 that Doug first met Falkland Islands shearers Lee Molkenbuhr and Jan Clarke.

Doug says that he has found that compared to most shearers the Falkland Islands shearing representatives he has met are "quite quiet and mannerly."

Of his meeting with Jan and Lee in 2008, he says he was impressed by their ability, but also by their unfailing good attitude.

Since arriving in the Falklands on October 30, Doug and his wife Ann, also a former shearer, interspersed instructing local shearers in the finer points of their craft with a bit of sightseeing.

At first unsure how his instruction would be received, especially by experienced shearers with their own well-developed habits, from his first session in the wool shed at North Arm, Doug described the reception and attitudes he had met

as "perfect." In his opinion, the shearers in the Falklands had no problem with hard work and had "a huge amount of talent" with two or three potential champions among them.

Lee Molkenbuhr, organiser of Doug Lambie's visit on behalf of the newly-formed Shearing Committee, said Doug's visit had fulfilled his best expectations and he thanked the Shackleton Scholarship Fund and Argos Awards for the financial support to make it possible.

With 12 years having gone by since Lee and his contemporaries had benefitted from the last shearing instructor's visit, he felt the young shearers in particular "needed something," preferably from someone they did not know and whose word they might therefore be more ready to accept.

Lee is sure that the main result of Doug's visit will be a better quality product with less second cuts in the future.

Doug said he and his wife "have never been treated like kings before," and thanked everyone involved.

He also thought local farmers were getting a very good deal for their money from the shearing contractors as "everywhere else in the world pays more."



Camp medicine chest network revamped and redistributed

THE KEMH Pharmacy Department has announced details of the new Camp medicine chests now in circulation.

There are now three types: island chests, settlement chests and mini chests, with the island and settlement chests containing the same assortment of medicines.

The settlement chests (except Albemarle Station) contain larger amounts of the most commonly used medicines, to accommodate for the potential increase in the number of people accessing a single settlement chest, now that there are fewer chests in circulation. The mini chests contain five medicines, also kept in the island and settlement chests.

These five medicines have been classed as emergency items, and have been placed in locations between settlement chests. When doctors reviewed the chest contents, a decision was made to re-

move those medicines that people could use to "self-medicate." Therefore, items within the chests should only be taken or used on the advice of a doctor or other health care professional.

Pharmacist Juan Sanchez said households in both Camp and Stanley should still keep their own stock of everyday "first aid" medicines to hand. He said the sorts of

items that households should keep included:

- Simple pain relievers such as paracetamol or ibuprofen, which also are useful for lowering temperatures during colds and flu like illnesses

- Indigestion remedies
- Antiseptic cream
- Hay fever remedies, if susceptible to this condition

- Any other simple remedy regularly used by the household

- General first aid equipment, such as plasters, dressings, etc

- A thermometer, especially where there are children in the household

Pharmacy staff are happy to help people with queries or requests about purchasing "over the counter" medicines, either from the pharmacy or local shops.

"We would like to take this opportunity to thank the Camp community for their patience," said Mr Sanchez.

"We are aware that this project has taken far longer to complete than we would have liked.

He also appealed to all medicine chest holders past and present: "Please will you have a good hunt around and return any 'old' Camp chest stock to the pharmacy for safe disposal, even if it is still in date."

Local art back in the spotlight

THE title of the book launched at the Malvina House Hotel on the evening of Wednesday 17 November is perhaps a bit of a misnomer.

Although entitled "Malvina House Hotel, its History and Artwork," only one of its 53 pages is devoted to the history of the hotel and the original building on the site.

The rest - bar a one-page introduction by Stanley Services Managing Director, Tom Swales - consists mainly of some 22 reproductions of local landscapes painted by artist Richard Cockwell and historical information on the places pictured put together by Lisa Watson of Sealed PR.

In his introduction Tom Swales

explains that the watercolours reproduced were all commissioned by Stanley Services to hang in the hotel's new 20-bedroom extension.

The idea for the book came when Mr Swales saw the paintings before they were hung in the hotel rooms and decided that they deserved to be seen by a wider audience than just hotel guests.

Richard Cockwell said that when he was first approached about the book, he was unsure how successful it would be: "I'm often not impressed with my work but took a lot of time to get the paintings ready, and I'm so happy with the final result," he said.

Richard recalled that his first commission for the Malvina House

Hotel came about after Mr Swales observed him doodling during a meeting.

After much persuasion, the painting he produced in response was a watercolour of Cape Pembroke lighthouse which remains one of his most iconic pieces.

After the launch, Richard told the Penguin News: "My paintings are just part of it."

"I think this book is a great educational tool because the details of the history of each place are so interesting."

Having himself only taken up painting relatively late in life, Richard was persuaded by an admiring friend to pass what he had

learned on to others.

The resulting "workshops" have now been running in Stanley for a number of years, attracting a steady number of faithful participants.

On Sunday in the Malvina House Hotel, this group had their first public exhibition.

More than 100 people visited the exhibition, which included work by Catherine Catton, Andy Stanworth, Sue Campbell, Jackie Cooper, Nicola Granger and Christme Bentley.

A raffle which was held in conjunction with the exhibition raised over £3000 for the Cancer Awareness Group and the Help For Heroes charity.

A day to remember

John Fowler joins the SAMA pilgrimage on Mount Longdon and Wireless Ridge

"They shall not grow old as we that are left grow old. Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them."

SHOULD anyone feel that these words written by the English poet Laurence have become a bit of a cliché from over-repetition, they should have joined the small caravan of vehicles which made its way out of Stanley last Wednesday morning.

Too many of the men who fought on Mount Longdon and Wireless Ridge 28 years ago, when they were in the full flower of their youth, are no longer with us, but on Wednesday they lived again in the memories and stories of those who served with them and survived, and those members of their families who still mourn their loss.

With their own stories to tell were drivers, Tony Anderson, Paul Anderson, Ken Aldridge

and Mike Pole-Evans, whose skill at negotiating the peaty slopes is only matched by their knowledge of the events of the 1982 war and their pride in the accomplishments of the British troops.

Each of their passengers had their own personal reasons for enduring the cold and intermittent drizzle.

Some, like former Para Peter Maddocks, had particular places to find: where he had sheltered

from artillery and stashed his boots. Others like Mr and Mrs Dodsworth from Birmingham and former Engineer Mario Reid, were trying to find where comrades or loved ones had died.

A third group, like the veterans' wives, and former RAF Sergeant Dave Bragg who flew in Victor tankers supplying the Vulcan bombing raids but had never set foot here, were simply trying to piece together the whole story in which they had played a part.

A mother's courage

"I REALLY have appreciated it. It's been a bit emotional and it doesn't always make it easier as the number of years go, but I can go back and tell my sons I went up there."

This is how Mrs Carole Dodsworth summed up her feelings just a short time after locating where her son Mark fell in 1982.

Explaining how her son, who was a member of the 3rd Parachute Regiment, came to be a

medical orderly, her indomitable sense of humour did not leave her: "They put Mark in the mortars and he was bored to tears."

"He said: 'You either get me something that's more interesting or I'm getting out,' and they decided to let him jump the queue and go into the medics."

"Believe it or not that was from a young man that didn't like the sight of blood."

Proper Para visits


JOINING 3 Para for Mark Dodsworth, who had his 24th birthday en route to the Falklands in 1982, meant following in his father's footsteps.


As he posed for a photograph with the other ex-Paras, Dwyn Starkey said of him in tribute: "He is the only proper Para among us."

While the Dodsworths had always wanted to visit the Falklands since their son's death here in 1982, their visit this year was instigated by 1982 2 Para Second-in-Command Chris Keeble, after a chance encounter with Brian who was sitting next him at a dinner that they both attended at RAF Shorncliffe.

Finding that the Dodsworths had not visited the Falklands, Keeble contacted Malcolm Simpson of SAMA. A week later their visit of a lifetime had been arranged.

The survivors

AMONG the survivors of the actions on Wireless Ridge and Mount Longdon were Australian Peter Maddocks, formerly of 2 Para, and Dwyn Starkey, from 3 Para, who as a Captain in 1982 was Second in Command of A Company.

Also present, but looking too young to have been involved in 1982, was Karl Nowell, only 17 years old when he was sent to war and refused the offered chance to turn back because of his age.

A light moment in a long and emotional day came at Furze Bush Pass where, in 1982, elements of 2 Para had gathered to endure a night of intense bombardment before attacking Wireless Ridge.

After showing his wife Geri the cleft in the rock where he had spent an uncomfortable and somewhat sleepless night, Peter delved into another crevice and emerged with a pair of NBC (nuclear, biological and chemical) rubber boots which he had stashed there before the attack began.

After 28 years of concealment the boots which Peter had been wearing to try to keep his feet dry in the sodden ground of the North Camp, but for whose non-return he claims he was later charged, still looked as good as new.

Recalling heroism and horror

DWYN Starkey was accompanied on Wednesday by his wife Alison and son Charlie, currently serving in the Falklands as a 2nd Lieutenant with the Coldstream Guards.

A Captain in 3 Para in 1982, Dwyn proved to be an informative guide to the events of the night of June 11/12 1982 on Mount Longdon.

He was quick to point out the difficulties of the Mount Longdon attack, through an enclosed space encircled by rocky crags, allowing access to only one company at a time, and the possibility that one sniper or gun position could hold up the whole battalion. Sgt Ian McKay assaulted such a key gun position and won one of the two Victoria Crosses awarded in the conflict, at the cost of his own life.

"Had it not been for the actions of Sgt McKay we would probably have been completely bogged down, but that was the breakthrough," said Dwyn Starkey. "Once that

position went so also, to some extent, went the Argentine resistance and they started to flounder a bit."

Standing close to the cluster of crosses, poppies and other mementoes that give the Mt Longdon memorial a homely personal feel, Dwyn Starkey delivered a chilling accusation: "What a lot of our guys found that was interesting was when they continued to exploit through here, the number of Argentines that had actually been shot in the back. This is a strange thing because if you have a look at the trajectory, firing at the Argentines from here you would have missed them or only taken those on the forward edge."

"This is clear evidence that in amongst the conscripts that were here were also the hard core regular soldiers holding the positions, and also involved in shooting those they thought were deserting over the back there - shooting their own guys!"

**Department of Agriculture Wool Market Report
18th November, 2010**

Tony Mills, Department of Agriculture, Falkland Islands

Looking at this week report would seem to suggest that the wool market bullish run has come to a halt. The story behind this flattening seems to be tied up in the large offering of 60,854 bales and the depreciation of the dollar against the US and GBP.

The bright news however is that overall prices are still up in historical terms including a significant rise on last years prices.

The EMI is now sitting at 616 p/kg down 9 p/kg compared to last week. Good competition still continues against Chinese buyers from European buyers for finer wool categories. There was a higher pass in rate than previous weeks showing supplier resistance. A slightly smaller offering is booked for next week so it will be interesting to see how the buyers react.

Cape Pembroke under many potential threats

CAPE Pembroke Peninsula, lying just 8km from Stanley, is one of the Falkland Islands most popular recreation areas.

A part of the Stanley Common National Nature Reserve, it extends from Hookers Point, along Surf Bay and eastward to the lighthouse, and also west to include Canopus Hill, Yorke Bay Pond and Gypsy Cove.

First designated as a Wild Animal and Bird Sanctuary in 1973, the area hosts an abundance of animal life, including silver teal, rufous-chested dotterel, and Falkland pipit.

Tussac stands north of the lighthouse are occasionally visited by tussacbird and southern sea lion.

The Cape Pembroke Peninsula is internationally recognised as an Important Plant Area, owing to its marshy grasslands where small dusky sedge and Antarctic eyebright flourish.


It is also home to the very rare spider-flower, nationally vulnerable pale yellow orchid, and is a stronghold for Dusen's moonwort.

More than 40 years ago, Garrett Harbin penned *The Tragedy of the Commons*, a discussion of the struggle to balance freedom of individual access to common areas with the preservation of features that draw individuals to those same commons in the first place.


Perhaps we should not be surprised that an area popular with so many and such a diverse group of individuals, located so nearby to Stanley would face this same dilemma?

A popular destination for bird watchers, trekkers, cyclists, dog owners, off-road drivers, and providing winter forage for horse owners, one has to wonder if there's enough of the Cape to meet everyone's demands.

The potential threats to this beautiful corner of the Falklands and its biodiversity are many: the seed of an invasive plant carried on a hiking boot, the enthusiasm of a dog for a swim in a pond, the thrill of narrowly escaping a bog-

ging during an off track adventure. Several invasive species already threaten parts of Cape Pembroke while erosion, resulting from historical and current activities scars the landscape.

It becomes more difficult each year to find a corner of the Cape free from the tracks of off-road

vehicles, while the risk posed by dogs to breeding birds is not difficult to imagine.

No visit to Cape Pembroke is certain to be footprint free, yet no one wants the area to be without visitors.


To the credit of various groups, individuals and organisations, some impacts are already being addressed.

Horse grazing is restricted to the winter months, with tussac stands near the lighthouse fence protected.

Invasive plant species are being targeted by control programmes.

Efforts to stabilise eroded areas and restore native plant communities are underway, with fences going up this summer, and a planting programme set for autumn.

Even the track to the lighthouse is being gradually extended in an effort to reduce the wanderings of vehicles across Cape Pembroke.

Victim of misuse and vandalism

CAPE Pembroke is a very special place to have so close to Stanley, and it has, or had, such an abundance of wildlife and very rare plants.

Recently it has been subjected to more and more misuse and it seems that soon most of the birdlife will have gone, except for the upland geese.

The last weekend in October is a case in point. At Surf Bay Pond a dog was allowed to rush in to the water and swim after teal ducks with young, to the extent that the parents eventually took wing and flew off.

On the same afternoon, further on and just through the gate going towards the lighthouse were three adults with enormous quad bikes, one of which was bogged in one of the little ponds to the right of the road (home to yellow-billed teal and occasionally the shy silver teal), while another was driving around and around in circles kicking up mud.

The criss-crossing of tyres not just on recognised tracks but over damp areas and over sand dunes is doing a heart-breaking amount of damage to a very fragile area.

Similarly, out of control dogs chasing anything that moves are causing loss of birdlife on the peninsula.

Cape Pembroke is a National Nature Reserve and it is up to all of us to do our best to take care of it, not just for now but for future generations of Stanley dwellers.

Cape Pembroke's future may very well depend on each individual doing their own part to preserve the qualities that make this area such a treasured recreation area. Helping out is simple:

- 1) Keeping your dog on leash if you're venturing beyond Surf Bay during summer (Nov-Apr)**
- 2) Walk to the lighthouse rather than drive, or follow existing tracks only**
- 3) Look for alternative sites for off road adventures**
- 4) Volunteer for one of Falklands Conservation's habitat restoration or invasive species control programmes**

No desire for new invasion

"HISTORY is one thing, but the reality is that if you were looking for 2,000 people to come here, I don't know how many you would get."

This refreshingly honest view of the difference between the Argentine national myth of the Islas Malvinas and the actuality of the Falkland Islands came from one of six veterans from the small town of Tres Arroyos in the Province of Buenos Aires, who last week were visiting the Islands for the first time since 1982.

Anyone made anxious by British media attempts to hype up the possibility of a new invasion would have done well to talk to these men, who were conscripts in 1982 and, with one exception, members of an amphibious engineering company of the Argentine

marines. Mauricio Garcia, who attended the Remembrance Sunday ceremony at the Cross of Sacrifice with his companions, and afterwards posed for photographs with a party of British veterans, told the Penguin News: "It would be impossible to recover them like we did before."

"There's no means of recovering the Islands. It's impossible today. And no matter what words pass from one government to the other the reality is that no one wants to make an invasion."

Travelling with the group and hoping to make a documentary of their return to the Falklands after 28 years is Andres Vergnano, who is Editor in Chief of the Tres Arroyos local newspaper and also works for Channel 9 TV in Argentina. **John Fowler**

3D SEISMIC SURVEY INFORMATION NOTICE

The **BRAVO SUPPORTER** has a blue hull and white super-structure and the **FAXABORG** has a green hull and white super-structure.

As the wider seismic survey programme unfolds late year, two additional Chase Vessels will also be in attendance: **FENNY** call sign **YJVM 4** and **LINDA-C** call sign **YJQT B**.

All vessels, which intend to steam in proximity of Survey Area One, are kindly requested to give the **POLARUS NADIA** a wide berth at all times. 
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

Real impact of reported port ban still in question

YET another aggressive assault on the Falkland Islands economy by Argentina became apparent this week with the report that - at the urging of President Cristina Kirchner's government - the Union of South American Nations (UNASUR) had agreed to close members' ports to vessels sailing under the Falkland Islands flag.

Reaction to the news in the Islands was immediate. One fishing company was reported as saying that such a ban would have "a huge negative impact on us."

Later, reaction from members of the Legislative Assembly and representatives of the potentially most affected industries became more muted, as attempts began to measure the full force and potential practical impact of the reported ban. Government House said those attempts would be ongoing.

The decision to prohibit the entry into South American ports of Falklands flagged vessels was reportedly taken at the fourth annual meeting of UNASUR, which began in Georgetown, Guyana on November 26, and was attended by most of the presidents of the 12 member nations.

However, it is not mentioned on UNASUR's own website and does not appear in the 2,000-word Georgetown Declaration, which followed the summit.

Speaking on local radio, Chairman of the Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association Stuart Wallace summed up the prevailing mood of caution: "Clearly it's not a welcome development and we will all be watching to see what force it actually has. We don't know for example whether such a statement has to be ratified by the governments involved or what practical effect will be given to it."

While the statement had the potential to add to the costs of the Falklands fishing industry and would be a major inconvenience to

vessels like the Concordia Bay, which currently goes to South American ports for maintenance, Mr Wallace thought the main sufferers would possibly be companies in those ports, some of whom were already negatively affected by previous actions of the Argentine Government.

Whether a real threat or not, in Mr Wallace's opinion, there are clearly some lessons to be learned: "Increasingly it is clear that we in the Falklands have to give priority to sorting out and establishing what we are going to do with our marine infrastructure in the future.

"It's a personal view because FIFCO haven't discussed it in this sense, but I feel that it's becoming a strategic necessity that we put resources into better facilities than we currently have. It's pretty clear to all of us that we

are facing a very aggressive enemy and they are increasingly taking measures which are aimed at seriously damaging our economy."

Mr Wallace said that while locally the fishing industry was waiting to find out what precisely had been said and what its practical effects might be, members were also hoping to see HM Government, who have responsibility for our foreign affairs, being more active than they appear to have been in ensuring that if Argentina is aggressive in this fashion, there will be some consequences for them.

Speaking to local media on Wednesday evening, Legislative Assembly spokesman, Cllr Roger Edwards spoke of the difficulty he and his colleagues and the Foreign and Commonwealth Office were having in responding to something which had not yet appeared

"in black and white," although they took some comfort in unconfirmed reports the statement by UNASUR included a reference to their intention of respecting the international law of the sea.

Earlier in the week, Cllr Gavin Short said: "We are naturally concerned at the content of media reports on this issue. We have not yet seen the text of the statement or agreement, so are not yet sure of its full implications for us. Once we have seen the text we shall be able to say more and shall then be able to consider our reaction.

"If anyone was in any doubt about the hostile intent that Argentina has towards us and their drive to blockade us then the Georgetown statement, if being reported correctly, should dispel those doubts."

"THERE is no legislation in the Falkland Islands regarding the rights of access to public buildings for people who have physical disabilities. The United Kingdom has only recently become a signatory to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Disabled, but so far the requirements of this convention have not been extended to the Falkland Islands nor to any other British Overseas Territory as far as we are aware."

This statement from the government's legal department came as a bit of a surprise to one who once used to worry that his hotel in Scotland might be closed down – not just because of the rats living in its 19th century cavity walls, but because if you succeeded in getting your wheelchair into the only downstairs bedroom, you had to go out into the street in order to get to the dining room for breakfast.

Lack of enforcing legislation may well be why access to the Town Hall – which passes in the absence of any other, as Stanley's social hub – is so difficult, if not impossible, for anyone not able-bodied and in possession of two working legs.

It may also be why, when former KEMH nursing sister Lidda Luxton fired the opening shots in a new campaign to get something done about it, far from blasting our elected representatives into immediate action, they appeared instead to provoke a rather mysterious historical debate about a phantom lift, and their detonation was lost in the mists of time.

It seems that once upon a time, so long ago that the details of its existence are sparse, there was a lift bought and delivered for installation in the Town Hall – not the chairlift which was once installed and then dismantled – but a proper lift, which maybe had those sliding doors that clang shut and brass handles. Who knows?

What is known is that it existed; what is not known are its whereabouts.

Now a lift is quite a big thing, not likely to be found down the back of the sofa like small change or discarded underwear. While I endorse the call for disabled access to the Town Hall and worry that the lack of it shames our supposedly caring society, if our government in its infinite wisdom is capable of losing something as big as a lift, should we not worry even more about what else they may have lost in the past or be going to lose in the future?

Desire's Rachel strikes potential

HUNDREDS of local investors will be rejoicing in the wake of yesterday's announcement that Desire Petroleum has at last struck oil in its Rachel North well.

Shares in Desire Petroleum on the Alternative Investment Market (AIM), which had earlier slumped as low as 97p on rumours of a dry well, leapt 51 per cent as a result of the findings, then dipped slightly to end at 132.25p.

Shares in Rockhopper Exploration, which owns a 7.5 per cent interest in the Rachel well, jumped 15 per cent.

Desire Petroleum announced that having reached a total depth of 3,052m, data obtained suggested hydrocarbons were present with 57m of net pay in multiple zones.

Desire Chairman Stephen Phipps was encouraged with the

initial results saying: "This discovery, combined with Rockhopper's Sea Lion discovery confirms our belief that the eastern flank play fairway in the North Falkland Basin is highly prospective and further oil fields will be discovered in this area."

"Desire's recent discovery may yield about 50 million barrels of recoverable oil, which would make it borderline commercial, but it is not a slam-dunk like we've seen with Rockhopper," said Peter Hitchens, an analyst at Panmure Gordon in London.

He also expressed concern that "the more successes that happen, the greater the prize and the more that diplomatic tensions will rise."

Desire plans to drill two more wells before the end of the summer drilling season in April 2011.

Medical Services Tax is 'easiest pill to swallow'

DESPITE legal difficulties which caused its name to be changed – and spirited public opposition from at least one prominent councillor – the Medical Services Tax Bill 2010 was passed by the Legislative Assembly without objection or debate on Friday.

Presenting the Bill, Financial Secretary Keith Padgett said the MST was "intended to raise funds to provide a contribution to the costs of medical care for our society."

From the beginning of the 2011 tax year, employees will pay MST on their gross earnings, including benefits in kind, at the rate of 1%, while their employers will pay MST on the same earnings and benefits in kind at 1.5%.

Self-employed persons will pay MST on their profits at the rate of 1.5%.

MLAs are being treated as self-employed for the purposes of this Bill.

Mr Padgett said the definitions of earnings and benefits in kind would be largely identical to those used for income tax.

For the most part, deductions will be allowed in the same way as Income Tax.

MST will not be payable on pension contributions made by employers, and pension contributions made by employees will not be deductible when calculating the amount of MST due.

Educational benefits are not subject to MST.

A number of Legislative Assembly members defined their position in relation to MST during their adjournment speeches.

Cllr Dick Sawle, who found himself accidentally seconding the motion when he raised his hand to speak to it, said there should be "no doubt whatsoever" that this was a tax.

He said although any tax revenue raised must go first to the Consolidated Fund, he wished to make it clear that the revenue raised by the MST was targeted and would go towards the ever-increasing cost of the provision of medical services.

The introduction of MST is estimated to raise about £1 million.

To raise that amount through income tax would mean an increase of about 5p in the pound, and only employees would have been footing the bill.

Cllr Roger Edwards supported the introduction of MST though, like several of his colleagues, he would have preferred the title Medical Services Levy.

He said councillors had considered various options including VAT, Fuel Tax and Gross Sales Tax, but MST was unanimously considered to be "the better option" or, as his daughter, Cllr Emma Edwards later put it: "The easiest pill to swallow."

Cllr Jan Cheek said it was "too important to let semantics regarding the title be a hindrance to something we feel we have to do," but she said she regretted the word "levy" had been dropped on the advice of the Attorney General.

Councillors, she said, were "not immune to the financial ills of the rest of the world," but she felt the MST was "the least unpleasant" of the options available.

"No government in its right mind wants to impose another burden upon its people," said Cllr Gavin Short.

He said the MST had been introduced "with a heavy heart" and the revenue would not go anywhere near covering the Medical Department's operating costs.


Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

REPRESENTATIVES of the PR firm Edelman are in the Islands this week and will be running a series of workshops with MLAs and officials. This is their opportunity to get a real "feel" for, and understanding of the Falklands to inform the work they do for us. I hope we can pick up some ideas of ways to present our case more effectively. I have told them that they will lose me if the word vibrant appears anywhere in the context of people or places. It is one of many hackneyed words and phrases seemingly loved by advertisers and those convinced that "management speak" is good.

UNTIL last week I had no idea how much frustration and anger is felt by those affected by the ongoing delays in arrival of airmail. Since then I've been given many examples, including items for which air postage has been paid arriving by sea, months after posting, and important spare parts and bank statements delayed for weeks or months. It will be interesting to learn where the delays are occurring. Is it the Royal Mail system or is it in military depots?

THE Wikileaks saga is interesting. It emphasises the fact that you cannot assume that any correspondence will remain confidential. I never say anything on email that I would not be prepared to stand by in public. Likewise, never assume that it is impossible for anyone to listen in to a phone call, and that is not an aspersion on C&W, but a recognition of 21st century technology.

Louder international voice needed for FIG

THE UK Coalition Government would like to see Falkland Islanders being more proactive in getting their message to the world.

Assembly Member Dick Sawle, just back from the Overseas Territories Conference (OTCC) in London and meetings with minister Jeremy Brown, says this wish stems from the determination of the British Government to view their overseas territories as assets rather than liabilities.

This more positive view brings with it a responsibility on the part of the territories to come up to scratch in areas concerning good governance, but also to define clearly what it is they want out of the relationship with the British Government, Cllr Sawle says, adding that it was made clear in the main conference that home rule was the goal towards which all British Overseas Territories should be striving.

Cllr Sawle says he hopes people will not misunderstand being proactive as implying another agreement with Argentina like that made in 1999.

He says he and his Assembly colleagues realise there is a need for the Falkland Islands to speak more loudly to the world and ways of doing this are being actively considered.

At the moment the Argentine Government is winning the public relations war "hands down," says Cllr Sawle. But he hopes that with

the aid of recently available historical findings, the Falkland Islands Government can begin to explode the myth upon which the Argentine sovereignty claim is based, namely that an Argentine civilian population was expelled from the Falkland Islands by the British in 1833.

While this attempt is not likely to be successful in Buenos Aires, says Cllr Sawle, he hopes that a start may be made next year to win over the Caribbean countries, including some members of the British Commonwealth, who last year voiced their support for sovereignty negotiations.

Saint Helena Councillor Tara Thomas will provide the political lead to a working group set up by the South Atlantic Territories at the OTCC, which will investigate ways in which these territories -

New AG appointed

MARK Lewis, a 45-year-old father of two, has been appointed as the new Attorney General.

Governor Nigel Haywood, who announced the appointment yesterday after interviews last week in London, said: "Mr Lewis showed strong skills and achievements across the range of areas. His appointment is good news for the Falklands and I have no doubt he will play a key role in ensuring our effective government".

Mr Lewis, who takes up the job in April, is currently Audit Solicitor for the Audit Commission in England. Previously he worked as a solicitor in a number of UK local authorities and as Director of Corporate Services/Head of Law and Administration for Torbay Council in the UK. He graduated in Law from Nottingham Trent University in 1987 and qualified as a solicitor in 1989.

He is married to Hengameh and has two children. His family will remain in the UK to complete secondary schooling.

Falkland Islands, St Helena, Tristan da Cunha and Pitcairn - may work more closely together in the future.

The feeling was that there were several areas of interest, like tourism, fishing, renewable energy, environmental protection and telecommunications which were common to all and might benefit from a consolidated approach.

Initially, said Cllr Sawle, this group would be something of a "talk shop" until its aims and objectives can be defined.

This, it was hoped, would happen before next year's meeting of the OTCC.

Other issues relevant to the Falkland Islands arising out of the OTCC included easier access for overseas territories to European Union funds, possibly even to the UK's Lottery Fund.

Bill passed, but no date set for it to become law

THE much debated Smoking Prohibition Bill has been passed by the narrowest of majorities – but when it will come into force remains to be seen.

Legislative Assembly members on Friday first went into committee to consider some amendments to the Bill, introduced by Cllr Emma Edwards, which allowed for the penalties for first-time offenders to be somewhat mitigated at police discretion.

Apart from postponing a renewed debate about the Bill, the net effect of the amendments, according to Cllr Sawle, was to make life more complicated than necessary for the public.

He reiterated his view that non-smoking legislation was unnecessary and that a better result could be achieved by education.

He did not wish either to place the burden of monitoring compliance on the police or see added regulations on signage, a view supported by Cllrs Gavin Short and Bill Luxton.

Cllr Luxton said although he maintained his previous position of “deeply not caring” about smoking, he was aware that a large part of the population was in favour of the ban and therefore he was abstaining, while being aware that this would allow the Bill to pass.

In the end the Bill was passed by four votes to three, with one abstention. Both Edwards voted in favour, together with Cllrs Jan Cheek and Sharon Halford.

The ExCo paper on the subject stated: “If the Smoking (Prohibition) Bill is passed by the Legislative Assembly, the Director of

Health and Education and the Chief Medical Officer will prepare a full implementation plan for the legislation (dealing with matters such as smoking cessation, health promotion and raising awareness of the smoking ban). Once that has been put into place, it would be possible to bring the legislation into force. These matters will be the subjects of future ExCo papers, if the Bill is passed.”

So it looks as if smokers can go on puffing in the bars of Stanley for a little while longer without fear of the law. And among them, no doubt, will be the Hon Dick Sawle who, as he passed the Penguin News on the way to the meeting, cheerily exhaled clouds of blue smoke between a big grin, on the other side of our office window.

Referendum to decide constituency

ALTHOUGH opinions about the need for a single constituency in the Falklands differ among our eight elected councillors, all of them agree it is an issue on which the electorate should have the final say.

First in the running order during the Legislative Assembly meeting on Friday was a motion proposed by Cllr Sharon Halford and seconded by Cllr Jan Cheek calling for a referendum to be held before the next General Election on the subject of whether or not

the existing Camp and Stanley constituencies should be merged.

The motion calls for a two-thirds majority in favour of a single constituency to be achieved in each of the existing constituencies before any change be made in the present arrangements. These allow three representatives for the 254 Camp voters currently registered (one per 85), and five representatives (one per 260) for the 1,300 or so Stanley voters.

Even if all the Stanley electorate should vote in favour of a sin-

gle constituency, the motion would be defeated if fewer than 169 Campers voted for it

Although the Assembly was clearly divided on the single constituency question, with Cllr Dick Sawle arguing for it and Cllr Bill Luxton saying he would campaign for a “no” vote, all members who spoke on the subject asked that the question put in the referendum should be straightforward and unbiased, allowing only a positive or negative response. The motion was approved without objection.

Like a lot of the Pecks, Des was self-taught on a number of instruments, and so his "pomes" would often end up being sung to the accompaniment of a strummed (if not quite tuned) guitar. Lack of finesse was compensated by sheer chutzpah.

So was he the South Atlantic Bob Dylan? Erm, no. But his "Argie" composition was certainly a protest song, lambasting the UK Government for "selling us down the river for a crate of bully beef." Nice line, that.

Strangely, I cannot remember when Des died. I think I had left the Falklands for a while and when I came back, it took me a little while to realise I missed him. Is it just me, or are they not making 'em like that any more?

Cuts represent loss of an icon

THERE are only a few British military aircraft that have flown into the collective emotions of the British people. Thanks to the Falklands, the Harrier joined the Spitfire, Hurricane and Lancaster in this very special club.

The not particularly fast little jet became an icon when its pilots took on the vastly stronger Argentine Air Force, and won.

To some extent, this accounts for the outpouring of emotion that greeted the news last week that HMS Ark Royal had launched Harriers for the last time.

Harriers will remain in service for a few weeks or months yet, but they will not go to sea again.

It is a very odd situation for the Navy. Two new Queen Elizabeth class carriers will begin entering service in about four years time, but there will now be no aircraft waiting to fly onto their decks.

The super-carriers will be without their own air detachments for some years, until the arrival of

the (admittedly far superior) Joint Strike Fighter. Not surprisingly, there have been plenty of critical voices, including those of senior commanders from the 1982 war. The have aired the view that, with the perceived increased value of the Falklands (largely thanks to oil) Argentina might resume its aggression.

If it did so, they say, the UK could not mount another task force with its own air capability. I think it would be more correct to say that we might not be able to mount such a task force for a crisis "like" the Falklands.

The Falklands themselves are, militarily, safer than they ever have been, thanks to the unsinkable aircraft carrier called Mount Pleasant, as well as Typhoon fighters and the capacious C17 troops mover, that could have the Islands reinforced at the first sign of increased tension.

But this is not just about military capability. It's about the loss of an icon. When the last Spitfire

retired, the British probably felt similarly sad. I now wonder if at least one Harrier will be saved to join either the RAF's or the Navy's special memorial flights. That, I think, would be appropriate.

Lib Dems didn't bank on a riot

LEAVING my office to drive home one evening last week, I ran into what appeared to be a full-scale riot. Making my way down Whitehall in the gloom, I could just see and hear a throng of people near the entrance to Downing Street.

An admirably dedicated street cleaner was trying to clear up the mess. Suddenly I saw him leave his cart, drop his broom and starting moving towards me.

"Get out of the way!" he shouted and, as he did so, I heard a chorus of screams as several hundred protestors also legged it.

Behind them was a phalanx of mounted police cantering down the wide street, apparently intent on retaking one of their vans which the crowd had vandalised.

The students, some as young as 15, were demonstrating against the coalition government's decision to allow universities to charge undergrads up to £9,000 a year.

Other nationalities are well used to paying heavily for their studies, but in the UK social mobility has long been encouraged by making education accessible to all.

So the kids – and not a few adults – are furious that education appears to be moving back to the old days, when the poorest people could not afford to get the qualifications that might lift them from the working to the middle classes and beyond – or from bricklayers to bankers.

But what had really provoked the ire of these protestors was the

hypocrisy of the Liberal Democrats, the junior partners in the coalition government. Nick Clegg's party had quite clearly said that, if elected, they would reintroduce free university education.

But here they were, supporting a trebling of university fees. From the Tories, such things are expected. But the Lib Dems, who had moved from the middle ground to the left of British politics? Surely not?

This university fees controversy (and it isn't over yet) has revealed the first weaknesses in the structure of the alliance. The devil-may-care slashing and burning of government expenditure is starting to hurt, and it is probably only a matter of time parents protesting about lost jobs join their student children on the streets.

A noble gesture for philately

MEMBERS of the Falkland Islands Philatelic Study Group have done a very noble thing in assembling a national collection for the Falklands.

Handsome Stanley Gibbons albums have already been donated to the Stanley Museum, and fulsome words of thanks from Leona at the museum have been published. Rightly so: it was a rather amazing thing to do.

It does rather surprise me, though, that a permanent exhibition has not been created before now. At various time in the fluctuating fortunes of the Falklands, the sale of stamps and cover has been all that stood between profit and penury.

Furthermore, the Falklands are, without doubt, one of the ten most popular territories among collectors – and others in that group include the USA and the UK.

I'm not particularly knowledgeable philatelist (in fact, I'm not entirely sure I know how to spell the word), but I do think that the national stamp collection should be seen merely as a beginning: the framework for a collection of postal items (stationary, early design work, correspondence about designs and marketing, etc) that could become really valuable.

Within Post Office, Foreign Office, FIG Secretariat and Government House files there must be many items of postal ephemera that, properly presented, would make an exhibition seriously interesting. This would be a good time for civil servants to have a trawl through the files.

The national collection could become a rather nice little visitor attraction.

Competition for the reduced number of tourists now venturing to the extreme South Atlantic and Antarctic is hotting up. Those little bits of paper that did us so well in the past might have yet another job to do.

Now the EDS is in place, it is time to give it teeth says José

If Part A of the Economic Development Strategy is the study of where we were two years ago, can it still be regarded as a relevant base for Part B, given all that has happened in that time, most notably the attempted blockade of the Islands by Argentina in the wake of the present oil exploration campaign?

Actually, the Part A report was not solely based on industry and economic conditions two years ago, but involved a longer-term trend analysis of what has transpired in the FI economy over the past ten years.

EDS commenced two years ago, but took stock of the trends that date back before then and what currently is facing the economy and what we foresee happening and evolving in the next 10-25 years. EDS did take into consideration the impact of the ongoing economic harassment, and has vigorously proposed policies that would diversify the economy and explore new channels to mitigate the effects of that economic embargo on the Islands' future.

Hence, EDS not only proposes further value adding (by broadening and deepening) within the traditional economic sectors, but also proposes diversification in higher value-added, non-resource dependent industries in order to take advantage of the benefits of globalisation (exploring new markets), trade diversification and import substitution, business and investment attraction, as well as upskilling the workforce to cope with the demands of a knowledge-based economy.

The development of the oil sector has been a late addition in EDS, but is now part of the new industries strategy. While political and economic tensions have arisen out of the positive developments in this area of late, the EDS core group has added as a key action point in the evolving annual economic plan the need to produce policies and legislation to ensure the FI private sector is well placed to benefit from oil development.

A group is being established to ensure that local involvement is maximised in all issues relating to oil development, led by the Director of Mineral Resources, along with the Head of Policy and GM of FIDC. It is expected that this FIG group will be working in close tandem with members of the FI private sector moving forward.

Tourism and fishing, two of the industries described by the EDS as "traditional" were in fact established in response to the

need for diversification of the Falklands economy, identified long ago by Lord Shackleton, among others. What possible areas for diversification, other than oil, do you suggest as likely to make a significant contribution to the Falklands economy?

Some of these new industry ideas (new growth opportunities) are outlined in Chapter 2 of the EDS Part B document, although not confined to: research centres (environment and observatories), offshore business process outsourcing and knowledge process outsourcing, non-traditional (and international) financial services, lifestyle offers, seaweed harvesting, aquaculture, waterfront development and oil and gas (services).

There seems to be evidence that even if no oil in commercial quantities is found, exploration will go on for at least another ten years, and in the process will have an effect on the economy. Shouldn't we be factoring this in to economic planning now, even as Plan B?

It is tempting and sometimes compelling to do such. But based on discussions with the Director of Mineral Resources and the British Geological Society advisers, we are still very early in the process to be able to ascertain that oil drilling is going to be a long-term sustainable activity itself.

Of course, this is the objective in the Islands Plan, to keep the drilling activity going and to progress this to full-scale development, if indeed there are proven to be commercially viable reserves down there. However, it is quite prudent to assume we are not in that stage yet, and quite risky to predicate the entire economic de-

velopment strategy based on a resource that yet has to be established as the new cornerstone of future economic development for the Falklands.

We have to remember as well that there are plenty of oil exploration activities going on worldwide, and the Falklands is only one of these. Business interest will always shift to whoever could produce oil and gas at the cheapest cost and the most commercial quantity.

So we continue to welcome new and/or further drilling activity with fingers crossed. However, without a crystal ball, we could not at this point guarantee that oil drilling activity would persist in the next ten years.

If, as you say, more advanced economies have been saving more than us, how come they are in so much debt and we are not?

Any country that saves and invests those savings back into its economy is bound to expand its productive capacity to generate further wealth. That is basic economics. China currently saves and re-invests 40% of its GDP to generate 10% annual economic growth. And China is just one of the many high savings economies in the booming Far East.

Savings and investment facilitate economic growth and expansion, which creates further wealth. The biggest failing in the Western economies is overleveraging.

The USA is notorious to have a low national savings rate of less than 5% before the recession set in. The American Government instead borrows money abroad to finance growing budget deficits, while private citizens also borrowed money which found its way into financing asset and property bubbles that destroyed wealth.

As I always say, creating wealth is different from preserving wealth. The West, Japan (and maybe even China) are great at creating wealth, all financed by savings (and the first two unfortunately by borrowing).

But if that wealth is created on borrowed money, and invested to finance an asset bubble (be that in equities or real estate) instead of real production of goods and services, then the risk of wealth destruction looms as we saw happened lately in Ireland, Britain, and the USA.

Coupled to that was lax or inadequate bank lending regulations (hence, the subprime mortgage mess). Without going into a lengthy macroeconomic discourse, we were insulated from all that

because we have had strict bank lending standards here at home (SCB has rather been prudent and tight so as not to trigger a sub prime market here!) and FIG remains on sound fiscal footing, (current deficit spending is financed by previous surpluses/reserves not by public/foreign borrowing).

However, a 17% investment ratio (to GDP) is modest, and has financed a 2.5% to 4% economic growth in the past. If we hope to attain higher annual output growth of 5-7%, we will need to boost our national savings and investment rate to something like 20-25%+ of GDP – and make sure we don't invest in an asset bubble (property or oil price speculation) but in real-life production of goods and services.

The attitude of Argentina is described in the EDS as "posing challenges for the Falkland Islands" and something which may require "a closer evaluation of options governing external relations with Argentina." Would you care to list these challenges and suggest what options might make a difference?

This is an area best addressed by the MLAs, FCO, and senior civil servants in close consultation with the private sector and the public. But the political dimension cannot be left in isolation as it has a direct bearing on the business, financial, economic and political risk of doing business in the Falklands.

I have laid out some ideas in previous EDS drafts, but these are best left for internal and public consultations. One encouraging development is the Chamber's plan to organise a trade mission to Brazil, as proposed in EDS, and a good start to achieve economic diversification through trade and investment promotion. Another area being investigated is the issue of new airlinks.

The EDS calls for a "broader and inclusive, but targeted and selective immigration policy that expands the current labour pool – selective, targeted, long-term and permanent." Can you spell this out in a bit more detail?

Work is already underway in the Immigration Review Group since June this year. EDS lends some insights as to what is the economic value of immigration in expanding the productive capacity of the islands, mindful of the contingent costs in terms of providing additional public services like housing, health and education.

Sparing the details, the crux is immigration could likewise expand the market for goods and services within the Falklands, help realise economies of scale, and bring in the skills and experience required for not only economic broadening and deepening, but likewise, diversifying into new industries that yet have to take shape in the Islands (eg software development, marine telecoms, research institutes, seaweed harvesting, back office operations, etc).

The key is to be selective and targeted, and one that encourages long-term and permanent residence so the Islands economy would benefit from a larger labour pool and consumer market.

We may not necessarily want a Dubai (where foreign contract workers I reckon outnumber the local population by a factor of 9 to 1), but maybe more like a Singapore, Barbados or Bermuda (where foreigners are welcome to work and share their knowledge and skills to help enrich the local population. And if they wish, stay here permanently). That of course has to be balanced with the political realities and the yearning for social cohesion.

Leaving oil out of the equation, if the retired population continues to grow at its present rate, other things such as productivity remaining equal, what size work force will we need by 2020 to sustain our present level of services?

Far more people than what we currently have. As I explained in the introductory EDS demographic piece, just to maintain the current per capita GDP or standard of living of about £35,000 in 2009, we may need to have a population of 4,649 by 2019.

By 2034, to sustain that £35,000 standard of living (in today's prices), that may have to grow geometrically to 9,457.

With the elderly dependency ratio (number of workers per elderly dependent person in society) projected to decline from 5.2 workers per retiree today to 2.1 in 2034, we either need to increase natural reproduction or import people to work or work-and-live here to support the growing pension, health and housing needs of the elderly.

Size of the workforce is usually 50-60% of the population, and we need to have at least 6 workers per elderly dependent to keep the economy viable and sustainable. That is if there is no productivity gain between now and 2020-2034, no oil, fisheries remain the same (sustainable catch has finite limits), and status quo maintained.

In short, we need more hands and brains to man our shops, our machines, our offices, etc. In a worst case scenario without a larger labour force we make our 70-year-olds wait for their pension cheques to arrive when they are 80 or shrink their pension

cheques and their health entitlements. Or, as 440,000 Americans have found out, force them to retire overseas.

Finally, while the EDS gives an admirable summary of the present state of the Falkland Islands economy, the only really new element is the detailed analysis of the likely result of any attempt simply to leave things as they are. There seem to be no new ideas and little real guidance in concrete terms as to how the threatened spiral of decline can be avoided. Is this a fair comment?

At the current rate our population is ageing, and not enough children are being born, so the demographics are rather obvious; we are in an unsustainable path – unless sufficient oil in commercial quantities is struck to support high living standards and social amenities we currently enjoy, or another fisheries bonanza is achieved consecutively in the next 10-20 years. That would postpone the inevitable.

If not, we face the prospect of a declining standard of living; hence the economy has to grow by 5-7% as EDS targets.

How? More labour (bigger population), more investment and capital (save more, attract more inward investment or maybe from oil income, if there is plenty out there), or work ever more smartly and productively (even at age 70).

Actually, there are a lot of new policy proposals to turn things around if oil is absent. These include a more open inward investment policy (balanced with giving local players greater opportunities to participate in new opportunities that may arise), upskilling the population (to gear them for higher value-added sectors that will be promoted and encouraged), and re-orienting the workforce towards a knowledge-based economy, creating an attractive business environment with a tax-friendly fiscal, regulatory and investment regime that promotes new opportunities, as well as providing the needed infrastructure to meet the demands of perhaps a larger population (ie immigration, new enterprises, etc).

All these are listed among the policy and resource enhancers in the EDS Part B document.

The next stage after EDS is to produce Annual Economic Action Plans to put more teeth (concrete action) into these policy thrusts.

Twenty action points were identified and have been presented to the MLAs and ExCo in November. These include specific objectives (from January 2011 to July 2012), projects/programmes, responsible leads, projected costs, delivery timetable, potential risks and risk mitigation, and clear deliverables (or KPIs).

The EDS is only the over-arching strategy. The real work begins.

A tantalising taste of the West in a hidden corner of the East

EVER wanted to visit the West but didn't fancy the idea of a ferry trip, or the extra cost just puts it beyond your means with your family?

Well, I'll let you into a secret: there is a little bit of the West just two hours drive from Stanley, along with a luxurious self-catering cottage, views to die for, horses that make you wish you'd brought your horse box so you could smuggle a couple home, and lots more to keep you thoroughly entertained for days on end.

Race Point Farm is the 6,000-sheep 11,800-hectare home of John, Michelle and five-year-old Talia Jones at Port San Carlos.

The landscape changes dramatically soon after the New House turn-off and, as a Wester for more than 20 years, I found myself comparing each Diddle-dee covered hill and rocky outcrop with various parts of the West Island.

The recently renovated cottage is next door to John and Michelle's house and at the centre of the farm activities.

Just moments after we had settled ourselves in to the modern, well equipped and very comfortable accommodation, a troupe of horses including two gorgeous Shetland ponies made their way down off the hill and were soon frisking around and feeding beneath the living room window: about as close to heaven as you can get in my world and, knowing that Michelle is a like-minded person, I was out the door and soon catching up on the history and background of each animal. Later that evening as the sun pre-

pared to bid a dramatic farewell and the wind finally lulled, I walked around the paddocks with my camera hoping to capture the perfect picture in the changing light.

The cool snap in the air drove me back to the house, however, and I watched the grand finale staged over San Carlos Waters with Fanning Head and West Falkland as the backdrop, from the comfort of the living room with a glass of crisp white wine. Better than telly any day. The morning dawned calm and clear, and by 9am Kenneth and I were in the Land Rover armed with a map and a plan to traverse the coast as far as Paloma Beach taking in Fanning Head.

John and Michelle provide coastal tours which include three types of penguin and some amazing scenery but, being a pair of dawdlers and experienced at off-road driving, we opted to go it alone for the day and make the best of the fabulous weather and the opportunity to explore a part

of the Falklands neither of us knew. Three hours later we were standing on top of Fanning Head in the flat calm, looking down Falkland Sound when we spotted a Hercules aircraft making a gradual turn in our direction.

Guessing it had caught a glint of light from the vehicle parked alongside us we waved madly and were rewarded with a lively waggle of the wings as to our amazement it passed below us. We lunched with the Rockhoppers at Fanning Head overlooking Tamar Pass, Pebble Island and the West, and contemplated the rugged piece of coastline resembling a Cornish postcard which was our next challenge.

By the time we got to Rookery Sands the sun was high in the sky and the Gentoos were basking in a semi-drugged state on the sands as though they too could barely believe the change in the weather, while the Jackasses sought shade in their underground homes. Giving the pebble beaches a miss, because once I start looking for the beautiful agate stones

Michelle had the horses in the corral on our return and Donna Minnell arrived from her neighbouring farm, Moss Side to join us. It had been a good few decades since Donna and I had saddled up together and we were soon exchanging horse yarns and memories of horses we'd known when we both lived on West Falkland. A perfectly formed and rather plump alaskan pony by the name of Terrific had caught my eye the previous evening and I was rather pleased to get the chance to ride him.

Talia and her school teacher Clare joined us for the jaunt as we set off around the coast towards Green Beach, where British forces had landed in 1982.

It was the perfect ending to a fantastic midweek break, and we'd experienced just a fraction of what's on offer at Race Point.

Quad bike riding, fishing on the San Carlos River and the full roast lunch will have to wait for another time.

Whether you are looking for an action-packed few days experiencing the farm lifestyle, or a relaxing weekend away from town, Race Point has got it all, including a landscape on a par with West Falkland.

Department of Agriculture Wool Market Report

Ian Campbell, Department of Agriculture, Falkland Islands.
The wool market is becoming more bearish with drops occurring that are perhaps more significant than they appear in Pounds, but AUDS has once again got a bit stronger and has disguised this. The EMI is quoted at 631 p/kg, down 5 p/kg compared to last week. Whilst the market may have peaked it is still very strong.
Global uncertainty quoting Irish and Korea an affair is given as the reason behind the drop. I think in reality buyer resistance to the higher prices is causing the auction rooms to be slow and lethargic. As is usually the case on a falling market oddments are slow to sell but stronger wools, still scarce world wide, are selling relatively well.



Chief Executive Tim Thorogood provided the following response:

A THE dry docking venue is a matter for the owners under the terms of the lease.

They did consult with FIG about it and both sides were happy that Monte was a sensible choice at the time given various constraints.

Q WHAT guidelines about intrusiveness and general behaviour are given to visiting film groups, especially those from Argentina? Is anything done to ensure that these are kept to and can anything be done about it if they are ignored?

A IF FIG is aware in advance of a visit by a journalist they are asked to complete an accreditation docu-

ment and are issued with guidance regarding their conduct during their visit.

The guidance notes reflect the expected conduct of the profession and include respecting people's privacy, entering schools, hospitals or controlled premises, conduct in relation to children and visiting industrial areas and military facilities.

It is perfectly lawful for any person to take photographs in a public place (whether in the capacity of journalist or as a member of the public).

There can be no right to privacy in those circumstances. Photographs taken at public events are often seen in the media.

The behaviour of a journalist that appeared to be unlawful would be investigated by the police in the same way they would investigate the behaviour of any other person.

Q WHY is it that the old Printing Office, soon to become the Regulatory Services / Attorney General's Office, is being fitted with electric heating? Surely, given the fact that this building has

single-glazed windows together with no underfloor insulation, this must be an extremely expensive method of heating these offices, compared with a conventional oil fired boiler and radiators?

Director of Public Works Manfred Keenleyside provided this answer:

A THE office is being fitted with electrical heating.

This does show a higher visible cost, but in the context of FIG and that building there are other factors to take into account.

Having taken account of installation costs, the marginal fuel costs and the estimated future running costs, it makes financial sense to use electric heating for this building.

This is not to say that it is intended to propose a wholesale move to electrically heating FIG buildings as the cumulative effect of that could lead to a need for investment in additional generating and/or distribution capacity.

Q IS there a time limit for loud music played in pubs and homes at night? On Friday and

Saturday nights it goes on to 11.30pm and beyond.

The Attorney General's Chambers consulted with a number of departments to produce this answer:

A NO, there is no statutory time limit for the playing of loud music either in pubs or in people's homes.

However, such noise could constitute a common law public nuisance, depending on the type of noise, the volume, what time it occurs and how often it occurs.

If the circumstances require (ie if the noise is substantial and recurring), it may be possible for enforcement action to be taken.

Ideally, however, the first step should be to try and reach an amicable solution.

One-off occurrences of loud music or raised voices will not constitute a common law nuisance, but complaint may be made to the police, who will do what they can to try resolve the situation. Although police powers are limited in these circumstances, they are often able to achieve voluntary resolution by appealing to the noisy party to be more considerate.

If the nuisance continues the next step would be to contact Fiona Wallace-Nanning at the Environmental Planning Department.

The Department will look into the situation and take further action if considered necessary.

A brief summary of changes to tax from 1 January 2011:

Income tax:
Personal allowance £12,000
Next £12,000 @ 21%
Remainder @ 26%

Tax Returns will be issued on 2 February 2011 and are to be returned on or before 31 July. Any income tax liability that arises will be due for payment on or before 1 October 2011.

Medical Services Tax (MST):
From 1 January 2011 MST is payable at the following rates:

Employee @ 1%
Employer @ 1.5%
Self-employed @ 1.5%

If you are employed you will pay 1% MST on all of your earnings, your employer will pay 1.5% on all of your earnings.

If you are self-employed you will pay 1.5% on your net profits before any capital allowances are offset.

If you are self-employed and have employees you will pay 1.5% on your employee's earnings.

Family Allowance:

From 1 January 2011 Family Allowance is taxable on the person who is the recipient.

If you earn under £12,000 per annum and you are tax resident for the full year you will not be liable to tax on the family allowance payment that you receive.

If you earn over £12,000 but under £24,000 per annum and you are tax resident for the full year you will be liable to tax @ 21% on the family allowance payment that you receive.

If you earn over £24,000 per annum and you are tax resident for the full year you will be liable to tax @ 26% on the family allowance payment that you receive.



G24 Chairman is invited to Islands

IN a ground-breaking attempt to have its voice heard more clearly internationally, the Legislative Assembly has invited Mr Donatus Keith St Aimée to visit the Falklands.

Mr St Aimée, who represents St Lucia at the United Nations, is also Chairman of that body's Special Committee on Decolonisation (C24). Mr St Aimée visited Argentina in October of this year at the invitation of the Argentine Government.

This visit was seen in the Falklands as giving the Argentine Government an unfair opportunity to make yet more propaganda in favour of their sovereignty claim, which is based on erroneous his-

torical information and also projects an outdated view of the Falklands as a colony.

Past Legislative Councils have questioned whether attendance at C24 meetings in New York was still appropriate, given the Falklands evolved status as a territory with a democratically elected government, enjoying autonomy in every respect except for defence and foreign relations.

However, as the C24 affords the only opportunity for Falkland Islanders represent themselves at the UN, and in view of the large Argentine delegation which is always present, the decision has always been to continue to attend. When contacted by the Penguin

News, Cllrs Jan Cheek, Gavin Short and Dick Sawle all said they hoped very much that Mr St Aimée would come.

Cllr Cheek said such a visit would "give us a chance to set the record straight," while Cllr Sawle said the integrity of C24 might be called into question if its chairman did not come, after having already visited Argentina. He said he also was encouraged by a UN speech made by Mr St Aimée in 1982 in which he said: "We must not allow this body (the UN) to be used to suit any state's convenience by ignoring the principles of the Charter when those principles are at variance with the perceived self-interest of that state."

The UN letter: in our own words

HE Mr Donatus Keith St Aimée Your Excellency

THE question of the Falkland Islands is discussed annually at the United Nations at a meeting of the Special Committee on Decolonisation.

As elected Chairman of the Special Committee on Decolonisation it is your responsibility to oversee these discussions.

The Falkland Islands Government is aware of your recent visit to Argentina, where you spoke about the Falkland Islands and the Decolonisation Committee.

While the Falkland Islands Government appreciates that the Argentine Government and media have their own agendas, you are reported as making a number of statements which were either factually incorrect or marginalised the people of the Falkland Islands along with the founding principles of the United Nations Charter and UN Resolution 1514 (XV) on which the Decolonisation Committee is based.

The Falkland Islands Government therefore decided it would set

out its position and offer you the chance to balance what you heard in Argentina through a visit to the Falkland Islands.

The Republic of Argentina wishes to subjugate and exploit the people of the Falkland Islands, against their will, under its own full sovereignty.

It justifies this by claiming that descendants of immigrants from Europe who settled in the Falkland Islands do not have the same human right to self-determination as descendants of immigrants from Europe who settled on the American continent during the same era. Conversely, the United Kingdom wishes to give the people of the Falkland Islands, like any other people, the right to self-determine freely their own political status and pursue freely their economic, social and cultural development.

The Falkland Islands wishes to defend its people and its right to exercise self-determination.

The Falkland Islands and the world are very different today to what they were in the 1960s when the original language for the ques-


tion of the Falkland Islands was drafted. While the islands and the world have modernised, along with the constitutional relationship between the Falkland Islands and the United Kingdom, the language of the question of the Falkland Islands within the United Nations has remained remarkably similar. It is now outdated.

The Falkland Islands Government understands that as Chairman you wish to modernise the work of the Decolonisation Committee.

We believe that, as you have visited the territory of Argentina (Tierra del Fuego) which claims to be affected by the Falkland Islands Question, that you should also now visit the territory that is actually affected; namely the Falkland Islands.

Therefore, on behalf of the Falkland Islands Government, I would like to invite you formally, in your capacity as Chairman of the United Nations Decolonisation Committee, to visit the Falkland Islands in order that you may appreciate the real situation.

"Recognising that the desire for independence is the rightful aspiration of peoples under colonial subjugation and that the denial of their right to self-determination constitutes a threat to the well-being of humanity and to international peace."

THE quote above comes from the Charter of the United Nations (UN) on its establishment in 1945. A feeling that these principles were being applied too slowly led in 1960 to the UN Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples, which repeated the same message that the "subjection of peoples to alien subjugation, domination and exploitation constitutes a denial of fundamental human rights," and caused the founding in 1962 of a Special Committee on Decolonisation, also known as the Committee of 24.

In the now distant days when I was an inky-fingered schoolboy, my Latin teacher – yes I did have one – once wrote: "You know it, but you won't believe it!" in red ink across my homework.

Reading the official report of the most recent meeting of the Committee of 24 gave me similar feelings of frustration.

Once again, the evidence offered by two of our democratically elected councillors that the Falkland Islands is a self-sufficient, largely autonomous country, which chooses to maintain its historical links with Britain, but is no longer in any sense a colony, was ignored.

Accepted instead was an Argentine version of reality, based on a debunked version of history and the unreliable memories of a small group of Argentines with Falkland Islands connections, who are trotted out annually despite the fact that none of them has been here for at least 28 years.

In October this year the Chairman of the Committee of 24, Donatus Saint Aimée, accepted an invitation to visit Argentina. Fortunately Mr Saint Aimée is a seasoned diplomat and no doubt resistant to any attempts made to pull Patagonian wool over his eyes.

Mr Saint Aimée is quoted as saying of his Argentine visit: "The visit is important because it helps to collect the most information possible, to have an idea of the feelings and it all helps for a better understanding and action at the (UN) Committee."

Pointedly, he added: "I can read hundreds of documents and resolutions, but nothing equals contact with reality."

To make contact with our reality and in the interest of fairness, we have to hope that Mr Saint Aimée will accept the invitation from the Legislative Assembly to visit the Falkland Islands, to which his office acknowledged receipt yesterday.

An irrational act costs driver dear

KYLE Joshua (21) of Stanley appeared in the Senior Magistrate's Court yesterday, where he was sentenced for causing actual bodily harm and breaking the terms of his bail by driving his vehicle while under the influence of alcohol.

The court heard from Defence lawyer David Lang that Mr Joshua "may suffer a drink problem" and drinking, alongside his "emotional immaturity," had caused him to act irrationally "impairing his ability to discern criminal and non-criminal acts."

Senior Magistrate John Trevasakis ruled Mr Joshua should be punished for both acts concurrently. He was told to serve 200 hours community service, disqualified from driving for 12 months and ordered to pay £170 in costs.

He was also subject to a nine month probationary period that requires maintaining counselling

with the aim to modify his behaviour and alcohol habits.

Robert Short (47) of Stanley and Wineglass Station Farm yesterday entered an application to court to revoke his disqualification from driving on the grounds of it causing severe hardship to his farming business.

In 2008 Mr Short was convicted for the second time in ten years of drink driving and was required as a result to serve a mandatory disqualification of three years.

The court refused the appeal, unsatisfied he had provided sufficient evidence of a financial loss comparative to his income before the driving ban was in place.

Also in court, Miss Alena Scott reaffirmed her plea of not guilty to the charge of unlawful wounding. Her trial is due to take place on February 8.

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Desire tries to deflect unwanted attention

DESIRE Petroleum almost become the laughing stock of the market this week when, after announcing it had struck oil, the "discovery" turned out to be water.

Shares plummeted by as much as 50 per cent, only days after they had shot up by 25 per cent on the back of test results described as "highly encouraging" by Desire chairman Stephen Phipps.

But, as the company announced it would abandon and plug the Rachel North well, Mr Phipps was forced to admit the result was "extremely disappointing."

Fluctuations in share prices, particularly in the volatile world of oil exploration, are to be expected.

But such has been the near hysteria surrounding exploration in the North Falklands Basin, clearly demonstrated when Stanley suddenly became overridden with UK journalists and TV crews earlier this year, the words "rollercoaster ride" hardly seem to do justice to the ebbs and flows of the current drilling round.

Those eager to share in its success are primarily small investors – ten per cent of the Falklands population is said to own shares in Desire alone – but they are now feeling the pinch, and learning some tough lessons along the way.

The latest news is seen by some as just another "false dawn." In May 1998 Desire's shares soared from 174p to 440p in a matter of days as the explorer said it had encountered "minor hydrocarbon shows" in one of its wells.

But prices collapsed 31 per cent to 117.5p as partner Amerada said it had found traces of hydrocarbons, but not enough for commercial use.



Desire endures a rough ride

Twelve years later, they are riding the same merry-go-round. But this time the shock waves have not only impacted upon the "mum and dad" investors, they also have pricked the ear of the Alternative Investment Market (AIM) in which Desire Petroleum shares are traded.

The junior stock market was on Monday reported to be poised to launch an investigation into "potentially misleading comments" made by Desire as it anticipated striking black gold.

The company said it had not been contacted by AIM and denied it should have held back last week's announcement until more tests on the well had taken place.

However, oil analyst Dougie Youngson was quoted in the Mail Online as saying: "I'd be very surprised if bosses don't hear from the regulator. It's probably the most extreme example of about face I can think of."

"It would have been prudent for Desire to wait until Monday before making last week's announcement, because it clearly got a lot of people's hopes up."

Mr Phipps said in a statement on Monday: "It is extremely disappointing that the subsequent wireline logs and fluids sampling have dashed all the earlier promise of this being Desire's first oil discovery in the North Falkland Basin."

But, as with all such announcements, he did his best to focus on the pinpoint of light at the end of the tunnel: "Despite this setback, the presence of hydrocarbons and good reservoir development have been identified in a number of the Rachel fan sands," said Mr Phipps.

One of the most respected industry commentators Stockopedia said Desire's unwanted flop was "obviously a disastrous blow to the stock and, beyond that, to the whole of the North Falkland Basin exploration potential... hence we should expect the chance of success to be markedly lower than initially anticipated, increasing the risk and depressing valuations."

Acknowledging the "heightened risk" of the portfolio, it added: "Desire is still well funded and needs to plan the next moves carefully."

Meanwhile, at least one Stanley businessman is relieved he did not act on a tip which he believed came from a reputable source.

Two hours before the London market closed trading for the weekend, he received a message claiming not only had oil been found, but it existed in commercial quantities. Had he acted on that tip, he would have lost half of his investment overnight. Unfortunately, some of his fellow investors did.

As another commentator noted in the wake of Desire's disastrous decline: "Beware dreams."

WikiLeaks reveals US concern over Argentine military action

SOME of the thousands of documents leaked by the website WikiLeaks recently show the US Government's concern that Argentina might once again take military action against the Islands.

These fears followed what reports described as "a change of language" used by President Cristina Kirchner's government about the Falklands, following the start of renewed oil exploration in June 2009.

A cable from January shows American officials wanted to know whether there was a possibility of unilateral military action by Argentina, or of a joint offensive with the help of allies such as Venezuela, in response to Britain's oil quest, reports Reuters.

The US State Department asked to be kept informed by diplomats about any discussions on the topic inside the Argentinian Government and "among military officers." It added: "Given current economic conditions in Argentina, it is possible that the country can use the oil exploration in the region to assert their claims over the Islands and surrounding waters."

According to the US Embassy in Buenos Aires, Argentina sought to exert pressure through formal protest in the UK, and through sending warning letters to each company related to the oil operations and letters to the governments associated with these companies. A dispatch in February this year

entitled "Argentina: Saber Rattling over Oil Exploration" added that the "budget-strapped Argentine military" was ill-prepared to respond with military force but that the country might continue to press its claims by other means.

Earlier this week, another leaked document on the WikiLeaks website revealed oil resources in the Falklands were insufficient to be profitable, according to Exxon Mobil International Chairman Brad Corson. The cable, from the US Embassy in London, was dated February 2010. However, Exxon Mobil spokesman Patrick McGinn said the company did not comment on "media reports, speculation or classified documents."

UK rejects Argentine hot air at gas debate

BRITAIN has objected strongly to attempts by the Argentine Government to use the International Conference on Climate Change (COP) as a platform for restating their claim over the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands.

As it had done at a previous meeting in 2007, the Argentine delegation issued a statement rejecting the inclusion of emissions from the Falkland Islands within the UK's Greenhouse Gas Inventories in fulfillment of its obligations under the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) and the Kyoto Protocol.

The Argentine statement included the complaint that "the Argentine Republic is unable to include in its national reports the emissions of greenhouse gases in the Malvinas, South Georgias and South Sandwich Islands, which are an integral part of the Argentine national territory, since these islands are illegally occupied by the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland."

The British response stated: "The UK delegation does not believe that this is the appropriate forum to raise sovereignty issues of any kind" and, in reference to the content of the Argentine statement, continued: "The Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland has no doubt about its sovereignty over the Falkland Islands, South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands and their surrounding maritime areas."

"The United Kingdom firmly rejects the claim by the Government of Argentina to sovereignty over those islands and maritime areas. The principle of self-determination, enshrined in the Charter of the United Nations, underlies our position on the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands. There can be no negotiation on the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands unless and until such time as the Falkland Islanders so wish."

"The Islanders regularly make it clear that they wish the Falkland Islands to remain under British sovereignty. The United Kingdom applied the Framework Convention on Climate Change 1 and the Kyoto Protocol 2 to the Falkland Islands on 7 March 2007. As such, the United Kingdom has included emissions from the Falkland Islands within its Greenhouse Gas Inventories in fulfilment of its obligations under the Convention and the Protocol."

The conference began in Cancun, Mexico on November 29 and ends today.



Remembering 1914 sea battle

THE 98th anniversary of the Battle of the Falkland Islands was celebrated as usual in Stanley, on Wednesday. A service in the Cathedral was followed by a parade and an act of remembrance including wreath-laying at the Battle Monument.

After the parade, which was led by the band of the Royal Marines School of Music, the Govern-

nor and the Commander of British Forces South Atlantic Islands, took the salute from a dais outside Government House.

Military units taking part in the parade included the Falkland Islands Defence Force and a combined services detachment. Falkland Islands youth groups were also represented. HMS Clyde was at anchor in the inner harbour,

dressed overall for the occasion and the events at the Battle Monument were concluded with a fly-past by an RAF Hercules.

December 8, or Battle Day as it is known, commemorates the defeat by the Royal Navy of a German fleet under the command of Admiral von Spee, which was advancing on Stanley on that day in 1914.

Police to target drink drivers this Christmas

ZERO Tolerance to drink driving is the message from the Royal Falkland Islands Police this festive season.

The campaign, in cooperation with the Mount Pleasant Military Police, starts on Monday and will continue through until January 4.

The crackdown will see officers on the street proactively targeting drivers they suspect of drinking, and breathalysing them on the spot. Arrests will be made on a positive result or refusal to take the test.

Normal prosecution procedure will be followed. Anyone found breaking the law risks fines, imprisonment, a criminal record and potentially their livelihoods.

Director of Community Safety and Chief Police Officer Gary Finchett said any amount of alcohol could affect an individual's concentration and the only sure way to be safe was simply to not drive at all. "I'd be disappointed if we caught anybody," he said.

"We don't want to be killjoys. We are committed to reducing the number of fatal and serious road traffic collisions that occur on our roads. Sadly, alcohol is a contributory factor in many such collisions worldwide."

He stressed the responsibility was on the individual to walk or share cars, as the aim of the campaign was to make people think before getting behind the wheel.

"Christmas parties are coming up and we hope to urge people to prevent taking the risk. Taxis are not expensive and many pubs and hotels are within walking distance.

"There is no excuse to drink and drive."

The number of drink driving offences has increased in the past few years and Mr Finchett believes this is an indication of their increased effort to target drink driving and not just more people flouting the law.

If you suspect anyone of drink driving you are urged to contact the police on 28100. Your identity will be protected, said Mr Finchett, and you could be saving lives in doing so.

Fuel emissions are threatening tourism

"THE biggest single threat to the cruise industry" was how new environmental rules concerning cruise ship fuel were described recently by top executive David Dingle, of Carnival UK.

The regulations from the International Maritime Organisation call for tough new limits on the sulphur content of the fuel used by cruise ships.

By 2015, cruise ships operating in designated Emission Control Areas such as the Baltic Sea would have to burn fuel with a 0.1% sulphur limit and by 2020, cruise ships operating everywhere around the globe would have to burn fuel with a 0.5% sulphur limit, with a possible delay to 2025.

Speaking at the Sea Trade Med conference in Cannes, David Dingle is reported to have called

the regulations "ill thought out... with numerous national and regional twists."

Stanley Harbour Master Malcolm Jamieson told the Penguin News the sulphur emission concern was principally to do with air pollution, while regulations regarding the kind of fuel to be used by cruise ships in and around the Antarctic had more to do with avoiding contamination of the ocean.

Therefore, he said: "The issue brought up by Carnival does not have a direct impact on vessels visiting the Falklands.

"There are no plans to adopt such legislation since the fuel delivered to the Falklands almost certainly does not meet the requirements and the supply of low sulphur fuel is a concern in some places in Europe as it is."

Chile to become maritime hub

HMS Gloucester proudly flew the flag for Britain as Valparaiso welcomed 34 navies from around the globe last week.

Chile is bidding to become a regional hub for maritime and naval arms deals after the shows of Exponaval 2010 and Transport 2010 generated over \$600 million in new business.

The country recently announced plans to modernise and expand its naval assets and took the opportunity to invite the world to the show.

HMS Gloucester, riding in the wake of her success in August when she intercepted a Caribbean yacht found smuggling more than \$6 million of cocaine, is continuing to patrol the South Atlantic into the New Year, despite some Latin

American opposition. As the United Press International reported, at a recent summit of the Union of South American nations, Argentina won regional support for its Falklands claim and Uruguay took the decision to turn the warship away in September in solidarity with Argentina.

UPI reported Uruguay would show the Royal Navy destroyer no courtesy during its tour while

Argentina remains focused on stopping shipping trade to the Falklands.

Chilean organisers welcomed the Western naval representatives warmly, despite the tensions caused from the latest Uruguayan embargo.

Admiral Edmundo Gonzalez, head of the Chilean Navy, said the event had been very successful and continued to grow.

"Chile has become the leader in maritime and naval defence exhibits in Latin America," he said.

Chilean Defence Minister Jaime Ravinet de la Fuente said the fair was "an important platform for the promotion of closer regional and international defence ties and for the growth of our strategic industries."

Environmental Planning will draft Canache management

THE Planning and Building Committee had 12 applications to consider on December 2.

Alongside the usual agenda the committee, chaired by Councillor Sharon Halford, received the results from Environmental Planning's recent customer satisfaction survey and discussed issues facing the drafting of the Canache management plan.

Two matters arose from the last meeting which were addressed first: ExCo dismissed the appeal made by Graham Bound against refusal of permission to erect a dwelling to the rear of 10 Barrack Street, and the other issue concerned the ongoing door debate between the Tabernacle trustees and the historic buildings committee, which is still pending more information.

Attention then moved to planning, and first order of business was the building of the new port at Port San Carlos. It was agreed it should be deferred again pending receipt of further information.

Conditional planning permission was granted for all other applicants:

- Erection of a sign at 10 Waverly House, John Street, for Ms A Bowers
- Extension to dwelling at 24 Eliza Crescent for Mr D McCormick
- Erection of dwelling for Mr and Mrs Z Elbakidze at 10 Mink Park

Environmental Planning Officer Antony Payne then explained the results of the department's survey, which yielded a disappointing 14 responses from 160 questionnaires.

Nevertheless, those who did respond were generally satisfied with department procedures, although they wanted to see more formal written correspondence instead of emails, increased site visits and promotion of their website.

It was agreed that this kind of survey should be established as routine practice.

Discussion on the forthcoming Canache site development followed, and the department felt a majority of the public wished the area to be maintained as an "Islander only" recreational mooring site with users self-regulating to clean up the area. Actions taken to improve facilities and prevent the site spreading or the cutting of access to the public pathway to Engineers Point were also requested.

Planning committee member Brian Summers said the option of walking to the Point via the road was unsafe with a "risk of being mowed down by irate lorry drivers." Mr Payne said the path was "hard to co-exist with fencing."

The Canache management plan will be debated at a public meeting in the future.

The next Planning and Building Committee meeting will be held on Thursday January 6 in the Liberation Room.

Livestock Bill meets EU needs for sales

FUTURE regulations may yet meet with opposition as "more bureaucratic nonsense" is placed on farmers' business, said Councillor Dick Sawle, who nevertheless supported the passing of the Livestock and Meat Products Bill by the Legislative Assembly last week.

Support for farmers through support for FIMCo was absolutely the right decision, said Cllr Sawle, and FIMCo relied on growth of sales to the European Union (EU) for improving its performance and profitability.

Financial Secretary Keith Padgett introduced the Bill as the first stage in a programme of work to replace and update existing animal health legislation in order to ensure compliance with EU import requirements for animal products.

Currently the EU is the main importer of meat from the Falkland Islands, and therefore it was necessary to protect the EU approved status of the Sand Bay abattoir, said Mr Padgett.

EU legislation changed constantly and current Falkland Islands legislation, some of which dated back to 1939, was not keeping pace with these requirements.

The Bill took a three-tier approach, said Mr Padgett - Sand Bay Export, Sand Bay Domestic and Camp Kill - which allowed flexibility in choice of legislation to be applied so that it could take into account local farming methods. Cllr Roger Edwards agreed there was no option but to comply with EU conditions if FIMCo was to be given the opportunity to compete, and he welcomed the fact that in its final version the Bill was flexible enough to take local farming practices into account.

FIH profits declining

STRONG performance by the Falkland Islands Company has helped offset a first-half year drop in profits by its parent company Falkland Islands Holdings (FIH).

FIH Chairman David Hudd said the results were satisfactory, with a strong performance from FIC following an increase in economic activity in the Falklands and the extension of the West Store.

A reported £273,000 decline in the company's profit before tax was attributed to challenging trading conditions in the UK and particularly a reduction in both revenues and profits at Momart, the company's art dealership.

Farmers and DoA flock to be heard at Saladero

EACH year the Department of Agriculture (DoA) holds an open day at Saladero, inviting everyone to come along and have a look at current projects and future plans of the National Stud Flock (NSF) and National Beef Herd (NBH).

This year it was held last Wednesday and, although the weather was inclement, a few farmers, FIMCo managers and even military personnel (based at Mount Pleasant Airport) joined the DoA staff at the Saladero wool shed.

The day was kicked off with a brief outline of the programme by John Barton, the Director of Natural Resources. The morning was made up of a number of presentations by the DoA staff.

Tony Mills gave an update on the NSF, in which he touched upon the introduction of Merino genetics and the future sale of the Dohne Joint Venture (JV) flock.

The current genetic goal is 22 micron, 4kg fleece weight, 30kg body weight, free of pigmented fibres on the face and fleece, parasite resistant, fertile and hardy. The following are for sale in the Dohne JV Flock: 78 ewes, 21 shearling ewes, 10 mature rams and about seven shearling rams.

Ian Campbell's presentation was on Saladero Wool. The genetic goal for the NSF wool is 22 micron in adult sheep and 4kg greasy wool or 3kg clean wool per head. As Falkland Islands wool gets finer, the length and strength will become much more important. This can be measured using the coring machine at FIPASS.

Mac McArthur did a presentation on the NBH. The current herd is made up of 48 mature cattle and 21 calves. There is a possible introduction of a Red Angus bull, as it has been said by some that they have a quieter nature, although the Black Angus cattle we saw on the day seemed very quiet.

Each year NBH bulls are leased out to farmers. This year eight bulls have been leased to seven

farms. It was said that there would be a possibility of separating the sale of bulls and rams at the Ram Sale in March, by moving the sale of the bulls to November 2011.

Mac also went through and explained about the FIMCo Livestock Suppliers Working Group (FLSWG) and the FIMCo Livestock Suppliers Group (FLSG).

Susan Campbell's presentation was "Progress on the Parasite Research and Advice." More than 50 per cent of farms are carrying out Worm Egg Counts, although 100 per cent of the sheep farms doing Worm Egg Counts is desirable. It is the only way to access the parasite burden and determine the need for drenching.

A weaning trial begins this month at Goose Green to see if there are any benefits to early weaning and, by February, results will be obtained. Also, a trial is currently underway at Saladero to assess the benefits of pasture spelling on worm burdens. The threat of drench resistance also was discussed.

Zoe Luxton and Lucy Ellis presented the benefits of ultrasound pregnancy scanning of ewes. The average conception rate in the Falklands is 79-95%, with the Islands wide lambing percentage being 53.7%.

Scanning can help close this gap by identifying single and multiple pregnancies, thus allowing better feeding and management of the

ewes so there is an increase in the number of lamb's surviving. Ultrasound pregnancy scanning also is cheap and versatile, currently at the flat rate of 5p per sheep. DoA staff are hoping to receive more training in pregnancy ultrasound scanning in 2011.

Andrew Pollard then finished off the morning session by talking about some constraints that seasonal rainfall and evaporation force onto summer forage crops, the take home message being the importance of timely sowing of crops, and the importance of soil moisture conserving techniques, such as spraying and direct drilling.

A BBQ lunch was provided by the Goose Green Galley Café. At 1pm everyone separated into Rovers and went on a farm tour, stopping at key points to view and discuss the management intensive grazing and pasture and cropping carried out at Saladero.

There was also time to view the NBH bulls, heifers and calves before heading to the cattle yards for a demonstration with Tony Mills, using ultrasound scanning to measure backfat thickness and eye muscle area, parameters which can indicate if an animal is abattoir ready.

Trawler scoops a King salmon from the deep

MOTHER Nature keeps surprising us, and this time she has done so with another unusual fish that was recently caught by a bottom trawler, the Pesca Vaqueiro, north west of the Falkland Islands.

The staff of the Fisheries Department were stunned when scientific observer Aristoteles Stavrinsky unwrapped his unusual sample: a 7 kg King (Chinook) salmon (*Oncorhynchus tshawytscha*), the most valuable species of all Pacific salmon.

But how did this stray specimen appear so far from its natural home, in the Northern Pacific? Apparently, with human help. King salmon are raised in Chilean aquaculture, and sometimes young fish escape in numbers from their cages to the wild.

In the last few years this powerful fish has made its way around Cape Horn.

It thrives in the environmental conditions of the Southwest Atlantic, and has already established

small but stable spawning runs in cold rivers of Southern Patagonia and Tierra del Fuego.

King salmon feed at sea for 2-8 years (usually 3-4 years) before returning to their natal river to spawn. Our specimen was a four-year-old maturing female carrying about 250g of roe, ready to migrate back to fresh water.

It is not the first occurrence of King salmon in Falkland waters. Last year another King salmon was

caught by a bottom trawler on the Falkland Shelf. Additionally, several specimens have been reported from the High Seas.

In the North Pacific, sea-running salmon are rarely caught in bottom trawls despite their relatively high abundance.

The main reasons are that this predatory fish prefers pelagic water layers high above bottom trawls, and it is fast enough to easily escape the net.

These few encounters of King salmon in bottom trawl catches indicate that this fish is becoming an abundant newcomer to the Patagonian Shelf, and it may well encourage sport fishermen to come here for a valuable catch.

However, there are already concerns that these voracious salmon may have an impact on some wildlife and fish species by outcompeting them for the same food resources.

Bill moves on telecoms

THE Telecommunications Amendment Bill 2010, which was passed by the Legislative Assembly at its last meeting, has been described by Councillor Bill Luxton as being "the first step into bringing the supplier (Cable and Wireless) under control."

Acting Attorney General Ros Cheek introduced the Bill, describing it as "the first of a two-part package of interim legislation designed to improve the regulation of telecommunications in the Islands, pending a complete overhaul of the existing telecommunications legislation which is considered to be inadequate in a number of respects."

The Telecommunications Amendment Bill 2010 is concerned with provision of information to FIG by telecommunications advisers. It also is concerned with improving complaints handling and conflict resolution.

Diplomat dies

FORMER Argentine diplomat Lucio Garcia del Solar (88), credited with doing much to put Argentina's sovereignty claim to the Falklands back onto the UN agenda in the 1960s, died on Friday November 26.

Beginning and end for HM ships

THE future of the Royal Navy's ice patrol vessel HMS Endurance may remain in doubt well over a year after it nearly sank in the Straits of Magellan and returned to Portsmouth on the lift ship MV Target, but there is no doubting the UK's ongoing commitment to the Antarctic Treaty.

One hundred years after the death of the explorer after whom she is named, the Navy's deep water survey vessel HMS Scott left Plymouth early on the morning of November 25, bound for the Antarctic.

Earlier this year HMS Scott, which is based at Devonport, surveyed 3,000 miles of uncharted ocean, and provided information for the safety of

navigation and entirely new seabed views of interest to scientists, including newly-discovered undersea volcanoes.

The ship's current mission will again be in support of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and the British Antarctic Survey.

HMS Scott will provide data for the United Kingdom's Hydrographic Office using her state-of-the-art multi-beam sonar system to collect information in the data-sparse waters of the Antarctic.

Despite the fact that HMS Scott is not officially an ice-breaker, she can sail through ice up to 80cm thick. Commanding Officer Commander Gary Hesling said: "The fact that HMS Scott can undertake useful and valuable

tasking, despite not being an ice-breaker, shows the utility and flexibility of the Royal Navy."

While one relatively new ship to the Falklands makes its way here under full steam, another old friend is about to suffer a very different fate. The aircraft carrier HMS Invincible, which was Britain's flagship vessel in the Falklands war, has been put up for sale as scrap metal on an auction website similar to eBay.

Decommissioned in 2005 after 32 years of service, and with her four Rolls Royce gas turbine engines removed, the government is hoping that the 10,000 tons of mild steel in her hull will be worth more than £2 million.

Should any reader with deep pockets and a welder be

interested, the aircraft carrier has been put on www.edisposals.com where it is currently listed as "in stock."

Latest reports suggest that no bids have been received, but Leavesley International - who scrapped HMS Intrepid in 2008 - have indicated that they are interested.

HMS Invincible was due to be sold to Australia for £175 million in 1982, but the sale was hastily stopped when the war in the Falklands broke out.

Built by Vickers in Barrow-in-Furness, HMS Invincible was laid down in 1973 and entered active service in 1980.

She was mothballed in 2005 after a refit which was supposed to extend her life by ten years.

Breadmaking, boating and sampling fur seal poo... It's all in a day's work for the boys and girls of BAS

THE British Antarctic Survey (BAS) has for more than 60 years undertaken the majority of Britain's scientific research on and around the Antarctic continent, where it operates five research stations, two ships and five aircraft. Tony Curran, as a guest of HMS Gloucester, was privileged to visit King Edward Point, its main base in South Georgia, and meet some of the dedicated BAS team...

UNLIKE other BAS outposts, King Edward Point (KEP) operates under contract to the South Georgia Government, primarily undertaking research to support management of the commercial fisheries in the SGSSI Maritime Zone.

Housing three laboratories, a communications room, offices, a library and living quarters, the station was opened in March 2001.

Manned by just eight people, they play a crucial role not only in scientific research, but also in supporting day-to-day life on the island.

"We are basically the logistics for what the South Georgia Government wants," says Base Commander Tom Marshall, 31.

"We make sure people can live here and do their jobs. A big part of our role is supporting the government officers and taking them out in the boats and making sure they can do the licensing work."

"The science work we do is all linked into the protection and management of South Georgia and the fisheries."

With such a small team working and socialising together, Tom compares the living conditions to that of a shared house. And he counts himself fortunate to be their head housemate.

"It does make life easier when you've got a good bunch of people," he says. "It has its challenges, but everyone has been fantastic."

Working alongside Tom are two scientists, two boating officers, a medical officer and two technicians (electrical and mechanical), the majority of whom complete a two-and-a-half year stint on the island.

Life on station is a cooperative affair, with cleaning, cooking and breadmaking duties performed on a rota basis.

All those appointed to KEP must undergo a thorough training course in the UK prior to deployment, and further training continues throughout their stay, from first aid and safety to navigation and search and rescue techniques.

But at the core of their activities are the specialist skills brought to South Georgia by each member of the team. The fisheries scientist, for

example, looks at how many eggs and small larval fish are in the catches, what damage the fishing boats might be doing, and how the population is being affected by the fishing industry.

Twenty-four-year-old Jon Ashburner undertakes similar studies in his field of marine mammals science, a role which combines the sight of breathtaking scenery and wildlife on his field trips around the island with sometimes rather less savoury work in the laboratories.

Still wearing the remains of his yellow and black macaroni penguin winter haircut, he talks me through the dissecting room and the lab, where he's delving deep into penguin poo. Well, at least at microscope's length.

"The higher predators are the fur seals, macaroni penguins and gentoo penguins," he says. "They are the three species which are reliant on South Georgia waters during the breeding season."

"Animals like the king penguins and the elephant seals forage much

further afield so they are not relevant to the ecosystem management."

He has a knack, too, of putting complex breeding and monitoring issues into straightforward language: "Higher predators are like the budgee in the mineshaft - they are reliant on the integrity of the ecosystem below them."

"So, if one of the fish species is being overfished or, for example, this year's krill didn't turn up, then you see that very quickly in the higher predators, because they then don't have that food available to them, their reproductive output decreases, and it leads to a fall in the number of chicks or pups in the next season."

This year, he says, the gentoos have been incredibly late coming into nest: "It is worrying, but these things happen. You do get blips in the system."

"Ocean currents are incredibly complicated, and we don't really understand them."

"When it starts to get concerning is when it's over several years. One bad season won't really have that much of a negative effect, but three,

four or five seasons in a row, that's when it starts to have severe effects."

Jon also demonstrates there's a lot more to scat sampling than I ever imagined. Through examining fur seal excrement he recovers krill carapace, like the shell of a prawn, which can identify its size.

And when he finds the earbone of a fish, which also survives the seal's digestive system, he can identify the size and species of its prey.

"It's all very well looking at the reproductive rate of an animal," he says. "But without knowing what the animals are eating, it's hard to link that data into the food chain and into the fishery."

Every now and then, he also has a carcass to work on: "We get specimens of higher predators sent to us, which have either collided with ships or got tangled up in trawler nets and brought back on board. We take tissue samples and stomach samples."

But, of course, there also is plenty of time for rest and play: "It's very much a family life," says

Jon. "And then we go out at weekends and go off skiing together, or climbing or go for a walk."

"Just being here is amazing. Every day is different. It all adds up to make it a very special place, and to see the whole cycle of the seasons is pretty amazing."

BAS people are generally pretty fit. They go through a rigorous medical before being sent into the wilderness, and health care is rarely required - but a medical officer is, nonetheless.

Sue Woodward, 31, is just about to learn why, as she prepares to replace Angy Jones.

"I think you are very aware of being the only person in South Georgia who is medically qualified," she says.

"You are also very wary that you're a long way away from a hospital, so you're probably a bit more cautious and you hope everyone else is a little more cautious as well. But that's part of the challenge."

All being well at the base - literally - it's the doctor who often

takes up most of the ancillary roles, which is really just a polite way of saying they help out anytime, any place, wherever needed.

And food plays a big part, through both monitoring consumption so everyone maintains a healthy diet, and through serving it up to her colleagues.

"I'm getting to learn new skills like cooking. I've never cooked for 20 people before," says Sue, referring to the Saturday nights when everyone on the island gathers for a three-course dinner. "That's probably more frightening than the medicine."

Teamwork and dedication are among the keys to surviving this rarified lifestyle, of course, and I find one character at KEP who epitomises perfectly the spirit which binds these people together.

Boating officer Paula O'Sullivan grew up in a small village in the south of Ireland. Now 27, she finds herself living her dream.

"I fell in love with tall ship sailing, and that led me on to sailing and ribbing and, to cut a long story short,

that eventually led me here," she says.

But there's more to her story than that: "I was on the internet one night and this video came up of a rib shooting through pack ice and I went 'wow, that looks amazing.'"

"I followed the link to BAS. I looked at their website, I liked what they did and then I looked at vacancies - and lo and behold they were looking for a boatman."

"I never in my wildest dreams thought I'd actually make it down here. But here I am. I've never done anything like this before. It's my first time working away from home, and I love it. Every single minute."

"The scenery is overwhelming. It's just magic, truly out of this world."

"You try and explain it to people, but nobody will understand it until they've lived here for a year or two."

Paula's words may seem on the high end of the complimentary scale, but her enthusiasm genuinely is infectious.

Just listening to her talk, and seeing her eyes grow wider as she repeats how lucky she feels to be here, is quite uplifting.

She understands, too, that so much of her experience is coloured by her colleagues: "I couldn't ask for nicer friends, never mind than to have met them on a sub-Antarctic island."

"I think it helped that the eight of us came down together, and we really bonded and we've all gone from strength to strength."

Paula helps run and maintain the boats and, alongside Tom, is one of the two advanced first aiders.

She also cooks and cleans, drives the JCB, tests the fire alarms, clears the snow in bad weather and helps out in the labs.

"I go collecting poo with Jon from time to time," she says. "You name it, really. Everybody just gets stuck in."

It is no surprise that when BAS offered a second year to the woman they hired as their first female boating officer, Paula grabbed it with both hands.

"I'd love to go on and do other stuff for BAS," she says. "As an organisation they're really good to work for. The support they offer is fantastic."

"I love boating, I get to do it in one of the most beautiful parts of the world, every day; I'm working with fantastic people and I get paid for it."

"When you take the whole lot in it just doesn't get much better, really."

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Christmas beer cheer causes huge headaches

IT'S not long until Christmas will be here and this is a time for celebration, meeting friends both old and new, and enjoying yourself.

But the season of joy can become a season of problems through increases in alcohol consumption.

When alcohol consumption increases, other activities increase, such as disorderly behaviour, drink driving, domestic violence, assaults, criminal damage, admissions to hospital, illness, time sick from work, sexual assault, sexual activity (especially in teenagers), child neglect, and mental health problems, such as depression.

Alcohol related illnesses and deaths also increases dramatically at this time of year.

The facts are that the recommended maximum alcohol intake for men is 21 units per week and 14 units weekly for women.

The daily maximum intake for men is 3-4 units, while the female maximum intake of alcohol is 2-3 units. One unit roughly equates a bottle of standard strength lager, beer or cider.

A standard measure of spirit/liqueur or a small glass of wine also equates to around one unit. These tables (above) give a rough guide to the amount of alcohol found in different drinks.

These guidelines are approximate and may vary depending on the brand chosen and the size of measure. All alcohol sold in the UK above 1.2% ABV (Alcohol by Volume) should state how strong it is in percentage terms.

The higher the percentage, the more alcohol it has in it. Pub measures are generally rather smaller than the amount we pour ourselves at home.

Last year when I was in the Falkland Islands I had the pleasure of doing a couple of talks to local schoolchildren.

I was shown the posters that the kids drew and designed. These posters were excellent and came straight to the point.

drunk and disorderly. Know your limit. Control your drinking or it will control you. Your drinking hurts her. Alcohol can hurt. Don't drink and drive if u want 2 stay alive, and Drinking and driving equals death.



Adults, whether they think it or not, are role models for children and the youth of today and youth of tomorrow.

If children and teenagers observe bad alcohol induced behaviours from adults, they will assume this alcohol induced behaviour is normal.

There is a greater likelihood now that teenagers will consume alcohol before their bodies and minds are mature enough to handle its effects.

Everyone wants you, your family and friends to enjoy your Christmas festivities and enjoy sensible alcohol intake.

The message is: think before you drink, be safe, be healthy, think of others, enjoy your Christmas and please remember that Christmas is also for children. So do not do anything you might regret in January.

We are setting up alcohol groups for people who feel they have a problem with their alcohol intake and wish to either stop or cut down their alcohol consumption.

There is also going to be a support group for friends and families of people who suffer from alcohol problems.

Although groups are being set up, one-to-one alcohol counselling also can be made available.

November whistled up to 60 knots

NOVEMBER had around average temperatures, was drier than normal and less sunny - but it had the most gales for any November since MPA records began in 1986.

The mean maximum temperature was 12.6 Celsius, compared with an average of 12.7C. The highest temperature recorded was 18C on the 19th and the lowest maximum was 7.6C on the 9th. The mean minimum was 4.6C, compared with the 3.9C average. The lowest minimum was -0.1C on the 27th and the highest minimum was 8.7C recorded on the 23rd.

The total rainfall was only 21.1mm, just over half the November average of 41.1mm. The wettest day was the 20th with a total of 3.7mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 14 days and 1mm or more fell on eight days.

There were 179.1 hours of sunshine, compared with the average of 215.3 hours. The highest daily total was 14.5 hours on the 21st.

There was one day when sleet or snow fell, well below the average of five, and there were two days with hail, against an average of six. There was one day with fog and none with thunder.

The monthly mean wind speed was 17.2 knots, compared to an average of 16.2. The highest hourly mean speed of 42 knots was on the 16th and the highest gust of 60 knots was on the 29th. Gales occurred on 13 days, with nine consecutive from the 15th to the 24th. There were 20 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots.

Explorer's benchmark

SEA levels around the Falklands have risen since the mid-nineteenth century and the rate of rise has accelerated over recent decades, according to newly published data.

Researchers from the National Oceanography Centre compared modern measurements from tide gauges and satellite radar altimeters with historical measurements made by polar explorer James Clark Ross at Port Louis in 1842.

Ross measured sea levels relative to two benchmarks cut into the cliffs and marked with brass plaques, which remain in good condition to this day.

Researchers found sea levels rose by an average of around 0.75mm a year between 1842 and the early 1980s, consistent with global warming and observations elsewhere around the world.

They also estimated sea levels around the Falklands had risen by around 2.5mm a year since 1992.

FIG's golden mint for Red Cross

THE Falkland Islands branch of the British Red Cross is coining it in, thanks to the Pobjoy Mint.

The mint earlier this year produced a gold coin, on behalf of Falkland Islands Government, to commemorate the centenary of the death of Henry Dunant, credited as founder of the Red Cross.

It also kindly agreed to donate 50p from the sale of each coin to the Red Cross.

Keith Biles, chairman of the Falklands branch, recently accepted a cheque for £1,841.50



from Keith Padgett, Financial Secretary of FIG.

The origins of the Red Cross movement stem from the horrors observed by Henry Dunant, a

young Swiss businessman, during the Battle of Solferino, fought in Italy in 1859 between Austria and the alliance of France and Sardinia.

He was so appalled by the suffering on both sides that he organised people to tend the wounded, regardless of nationality.

Subsequently, mainly through his work, the first Geneva Convention was signed and ratified in 1864, which gave rise eventually to formation of the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) in 1875.

The next competitive overseas games are the Island Games held in the Isle of Wight next year.

A brief summary of changes to tax from 1 January 2011:

Income tax:

Personal allowance £12,000
Next £12,000 @ 21%
Remainder @ 26%

Tax Returns will be issued on 2 February 2011 and are to be returned on or before 31 July. Any income tax liability that arises will be due for payment on or before 1 October 2011.

Medical Services Tax (MST):

From 1 January 2011 MST is payable at the following rates:

Employee @ 1%
Employer @ 1.5%
Self-employed @ 1.5%

If you are employed you will pay 1% MST on all of your earnings, your employer will pay 1.5% on all of your earnings.

If you are self-employed you will pay 1.5% on your net profits before any capital allowances are offset.

If you are self-employed and have employees you will pay 1.5% on your employee's earnings.

Family Allowance:

From 1 January 2011 Family Allowance is taxable on the person who is the recipient.

If you earn under £12,000 per annum and you are tax resident for the full year you will not be liable to tax on the family allowance payment that you receive.

If you earn over £12,000 but under £24,000 per annum and you are tax resident for the full year you will be liable to tax @ 21% on the family allowance payment that you receive.

If you earn over £24,000 per annum and you are tax resident for the full year you will be liable to tax @ 26% on the family allowance payment that you receive.



FIFCA fires broadside

FALKLAND Islands Fishing Companies Association Chairman Stuart Wallace on Wednesday blasted Argentina for refusing to engage constructively in the management of marine resources.

He told guests at a FIFCA dinner its actions were a "disgrace," leading to the collapse of the southern blue whiting stock, a "truly avoidable environmental tragedy." But he remained positive about the industry's future: "We have a fishery managed to ensure sustainability, sound science, a commitment to fishing responsibly, an excellent reputation established over more than two decades and a property rights system providing an environment in which investors with the courage to invest in our sector have confidence."

How FIG's wheels 'turn square' for councillors

THE frustrations of Legislative Assembly Members in dealing with the ponderous machinations of government were this week revealed in frank revelations from veteran councillors.

Cllr Sharon Halford said that since her last time in office "nothing has changed" in terms of government process.

She said if councillors as a group wanted something done, it would happen fairly quickly, provided "those people in FIG" agreed with it. Without FIG support, she said, "the wheels of government will tend to go square."

Cllr Halford's comments came after a lively debate at Tuesday's public meeting during which the government's commitment to succession planning was questioned, sparking a split in the usually united front presented by MLAs in public.

When former Financial Secretary Derek Howatt pointed out that

over the past 27 years, each successive Chief Executive had failed to train a local replacement, Cllr Roger Edwards – by his own admission "putting his head in the lion's mouth" – said that in his opinion the Chief Executive's post could never be filled by an Islander, because a local candidate could not acquire the necessary expertise.

His statement prompted an accusation of out-dated colonial thinking from one member of the audience and a vigorous denial from several of his Assembly colleagues, including Cllr Glenn Ross who said he could immediately identify half a dozen locals perfectly capable of filling the Chief Executive's post.

He said not aiming to fill the position locally was "really rather pathetic," and that an outgoing Chief Executive should never be part of the recruitment process for his successor.

Cllr Ross said that when he returned to the Falklands from overseas study in 1995, he had "tremendous hope for the place because everywhere I looked we had Falkland Islanders heading up departments and in charge of very complex operations with minimal fuss." Now, though, he believed "we have really gone backwards."

He said he feared many of the people who then were doing those jobs very well would now not be considered sufficiently qualified.

Support for Cllr Ross's views came from Cllr Gavin Short who identified the unpopular Hay Management Review of Government in the 1990s as having encouraged a tendency for government job descriptions to be overwritten with an excessive focus on qualifications at the expense of "common sense and experience."

Cllr Dick Sawle agreed that some job descriptions appeared to exclude local candidates.

Lewis Clifton asked whether candidates for government posts were subject to the same scrutiny from the Customs and Immigration Department as private sector appointees. When no clear answer was presented from councillors, Phil Middleton suggested there were two different systems of recruitment in operation.

Tim Miller also complained that the immigration rules only applied to the private sector, which he said was unfair.

In response, Cllr Gavin Short said he felt both sectors should be treated equally. He said there was a current disagreement between councillors and government administrators over immigration, but he gave no detail.

Cllr Jan Cheek pre-empted Cllr Halford's comments when she said the "stumbling block" was "not among the higher echelons, but further down."

TUESDAY'S public meeting came as a bit of a shock. No big fan of public meetings in the past, I came away from the Town Hall feeling that I had witnessed something significantly different.

One difference I suppose was the lack of an agenda, whether overt or hidden. In consequence, discussions were allowed to flow and grow with no instruction to move on to other topics coming from the chair when comments from the audience took a critical turn.

Another difference was that no one on the councillors' side of the table seemed inclined to play the "we know better than you" card, so frequently flourished in the past as a tool for dismissing intrusive questions and belittling the questioner.

So far so good, and even better when, without even the need to enter a phone box, Roger Edwards metaphorically ripped off his lounge suit to reveal himself as "Super Brit," complete with Union Flag underpants over his tights, and it emerged from their outraged reaction that members of the Legislative Assembly had not yet morphed into one homogenous entity, but were still individuals who occasionally differed significantly.

We have known all along that this must be the case, but it was good to see it so starkly confirmed, and good also that no one rose to support an antedeluvian attitude which, in its denial of our own people's capabilities, plays straight into the hands of the Argentine Government and their contention that we are still nothing but a colony.

How we go about choosing the head of the administration is clearly important, if only for the increasingly obvious reason that while our councillors remain less well paid than him, less professionally supported in terms of secretarial help, and without any direct ministerial powers and responsibility, the Chief Executive will always tend to be the tail that wags the government dog.

The unpalatable truth that without the cooperation of the administration little or nothing gets done was hinted at by Cllr Gavin Short in relation to an undefined problem existing between councillors and the Customs and Immigration Department. An even franker acknowledgement was veteran Cllr Sharon Halford's contention that nothing had changed since her last stint as a councillor and that if "those people in FIG" don't support proposals unanimsously made by councillors, "the wheels of government will tend to go square."

Such frankness by councillors is admirable but, while their apparent acceptance of impotence in the face of an entrenched administration might explain last week's lift mystery, it leaves me wondering who exactly is in charge.

London calling for Battle Day

THE Falkland Islands Battle Day was commemorated at the Cenotaph in the heart of London on Saturday under dull skies, but in good spirits, and with a good turnout.

A Colour Guard was formed by Royal Navy sailors from Portsmouth and cadets from Pangbourne Naval College, and led by Air Commodore Peter Johnson, a former Commander of British Forces in the Falklands.

Colonel Chris Keeble laid the wreath for the Armed Forces, and inspected the Colour Guard after the ceremony. He took over command of 2 Para at the Battle of Goose Green after Colonel H Jones was killed.

FIA Chairman David Tatham laid the wreath for the Association and Falklands Islands Government Representative Sukey Cameron did so on behalf of the Falklands. Many other wreaths also were laid.

The service was conducted by the Reverend Stephen Palmer who has taken over as Chaplain to the FIA following the sad death of the Reverend Peter Millam earlier this year. Stephen Palmer is also a chaplain to the Queen, and a former rector of Christ Church Cathedral in Stanley.

The ceremony was followed by the AGM of the Falkland Islands Association at the London Union Jack Club, where Sean Moffatt was awarded the Bill Hunter-Christie prize as outstanding Falklands student of the year in Britain. He has just graduated as a design maker from Plymouth University and is now studying design technology.

Battle Day originally commemorated the defeat of the German fleet in 1914, and now remembers those who fell both in the Second World War and in the liberation of the Islands in 1982.

Two assault charges denied

CLAUDIO Sepulveda Briones (48) of Stanley was again in court on Monday accused of two assaults by beating on the night of December 11/12. He denied both charges.

Mr Briones is currently awaiting trial for another two charges of

assault, which he has admitted. He was released on conditional bail, and allowed no contact with the victim, any witness or to visit the Discovery Close area.

The case was adjourned until January 5.

Pirate penguins on the high seas


FALKLANDS inspired cartoon characters will be finding their way into a few Christmas stockings next week.

"It is important that the next generation of British readers understand how the Falkland Islands is culturally, commercially, historically, and militarily important to the UK.

"I have a love and passion for penguins and it seemed logical to write a comical book around their funny exploits."

Trained in journalism, he works as a marketing manager for YTKO/Outset Plymouth, an organisation which helps people set up local businesses.

Couple trapped

AN elderly couple were trapped in their vehicle after a collision with a lightweight lorry on the Stanley bypass outside the Chandlery on Wednesday lunchtime. Gales havoc

SEVERE gales caused damage across Stanley overnight on Monday. A large piece of the Sea Cadets hut roof blew off at about 4am, a portakabin roof blew off on Hebe Street, landing on the owner's trailer, and the Falklands Conservation portakabin on the Lookout Industrial Estate was "blown to bits," according to the fire service. No injuries were reported. Meanwhile, KTV technicians were attending to numerous callouts in response to damaged acrials.

Power surge

STANLEY Power Station staff took prompt action to avoid a total electricity blackout yesterday morning after an engine shut down shortly before 8am caused an overload in the central circuit of east and west Stanley. Power was restored a few minutes later.

Final flypast

BRITAIN on Wednesday paid tribute to a joint force of Royal Navy and RAF Harrier aircraft with a spectacular flypast to mark their retirement after 41 years of service. The planes may be sold to the US or India.

SEVEN Spanish fishing companies from Vigo plan to invest 120m euros in new freezer trawlers, some of which will be working in Falklands waters.

Post staff ploughing on to deliver mail on time

FALKLANDS residents have been reassured their Christmas mail will be arriving on time – provided, of course it was posted on time.

Concerns there may be a backlog of more than 1,000 packages destined for military and civilians in the Islands were dismissed by a spokesperson at Brize Norton RAF base, who said all mail and freight was being carried to the Falklands as normal on the twice weekly scheduled flights, and that the A320 airbus aircraft were not anticipating any delays, despite the worsening weather in the UK.

Stanley Postmaster Moira Eccles also was eager to lay to rest any seasonal worries over the late arrival of Christmas cards and presents.

She said bad weather in the UK had slowed delivery and increased internet shopping volumes signifi-

cantly, but staff were putting in an extra effort to minimise any local delays. She said there was a large quantity of mail sitting at Brize Norton but this was a seasonal build-up made more apparent this year because mail deliveries currently were reduced to once rather than twice weekly due the resurfacing works at MPA.

Mrs Eccles said the Post Office had in place plans to transport the majority of mail into Stanley over the weekend and to work as much as possible before opening for business on Monday morning.

"The Post Office target for having airmail available for collection during the resurfacing period is 2pm on a Tuesday," she said.

"We have been exceeding this target due to the fact that Post Office staff have been flexible and willing to transport the mail into

Stanley and to spend time processing the bulk of it during the week-ends. While we anticipate receiving a lot of mail over this coming weekend we still hope to achieve our target of having all the airmail available for collection by 2pm on Tuesday.

She said she was especially grateful to her staff for the extra effort they were putting in to minimise any local delay to customers receiving mail.

A spokesperson at MPA said no additional air freighter was being organised and all mail expected on the Islands would reach here as scheduled. Any freighting would concern only packages too large or too heavy to be carried by regular mail, which was standard procedure. All UK mail posted by December 14 is scheduled to be on this weekend's flight.

Death of a true and loyal friend

WHILE we may be wondering what we have ever done to upset former Guardian editor Peter Preston, whose claims this week that the Islands should be "leased back" by Britain to Argentina betray a total misunderstanding of reality, one long-serving Guardian journalist on whose understanding and friendship we could count was John Ezard, who died on December 11 from complications to a lung condition.

In his obituary the Guardian wrote: "It was characteristic that having had a first taste of the Falkland Islands shortly after the

1982 war, John not only followed its fortunes but returned several times, writing about the Islands' people with admiration for their straightness and fortitude. 'Of all the stories of courage, death and glory that have come out of the Falklands conflict,' he wrote, 20 years after the war, 'few have been about what I have come to think of as the other Falklands task force. These are the civilians who have lived, worked and stubbornly survived in that hard, exquisite land'."

This place did not seem to him like the last, gung-ho refuge of

colonialist right wingers that some Guardian writers had portrayed and, after a visit to Stanley cemetery, he painted a poignant picture of the struggles of those who died young in the mid 19th century: "I had come to feel that the dead in this other force merited the same esteem as our war dead; and that its living members deserved help – preferably an impetus to self-help."

Falkland Islands Government Representative in London, Sukey Cameron said: "The Falkland Islands have lost a very true and loyal friend."

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

AS we await a response from the chairman of C24, the somewhat hysterical comments from individuals, presumably of Argentine nationality, attached to the Mercopress article on the subject make revealing reading

For every balanced comment there are several abusive, irrational or threatening ones. I'm often amazed by the unbridled malice exhibited by those who hide behind pseudonyms and do not have the courage to speak out.

It is good to see that the fraught question of multiple large cruise vessels on the same day being actively discussed.

I hope that a satisfactory solution can be reached before trade picks up again and the problem is exacerbated.

I remember the cries of "we'll never come back!" when we had to put up landing fees to cover the costs of security. I have a feeling that it is the same groups (who did come back) who are now showing little regard for the experience of their passengers.

As a destination we cannot afford to have thousands of tourists going away having had bad experiences ashore. Unfortunately bad news stories spread faster and further than good news and can negate a lot of hard work by the good operators.

I HOPE everyone with an interest in education in the Falklands will read the School Inspection reports with care.

They should be available after Executive Council this week so I'm disclosing no secrets when I say that as well as no surprises, they present, with one predictable exception, a picture of much good work by mainly dedicated staff.

While we can never afford to be complacent about education in an increasingly competitive world it is good to know that we have staff committed to raising standards and expectations.

I cannot over emphasise the role parents have to play in this. Active parental support and interest can make a huge difference to students' ability to achieve their full potential. I'm always saddened to see an apparent falling away of parents attending parent evenings and meetings when their offspring move into secondary education. Please support your children and their teachers for best outcomes for the students.

Emergency and military hardware packs a punch

"It's hard to imagine a major accident that would not require all services to be involved," said Chief Supt Finchett.

"Because we rely on cooperation from each other it's important we create opportunities like this so that we can see what each service has to offer."

The RFIP learned on the day that all the Sea King staff were trained, or were training to be paramedics – and that they could

winch up to three people at any one time.

The main draw for the public was the Sea King helicopter perched at one end of the field.

Squadron Leader Mark Vickery, who organised the event alongside Geoff Loftus of the Fire and Rescue Service, explained to the queue of people hurrying inside the rescue craft that it was

designed to seat 12 people, although it could take more: "In an emergency we could hypothetically rescue more by lying and seating people on the floor," he said.

"Squadron Leader Mark Vickery and Geoff Loftus did a great job organising the event," said Chief Supt Finchett. "It's great to see the public turn up and the kids ask such interesting questions."

New Falklands War movie set

A NEW feature film about the Falklands War is to be cast and filmed entirely on the Isle of Man.

The project is called Betrayed and charts a soldier's battle with post traumatic stress disorder.

The idea for the film came from a series of acting workshops held on the island by actor Lee Boardman.

He and director Lesley Manning have spent the past few months developing the script.

Mr Boardman said: "We have been staggered by how much talent there is on the Isle of Man so we have tailored the roles to fit the actors we have worked with.

"We want to make a movie about the war, but make it on a really low budget which has never really done before.

"It will be an Isle of Man feature film made only with actors from the Island."

Producer Phil Gates described the project as "a man's journey through the battle and the aftermath."

A percentage of profits from the film will be donated to an appropriate charity dealing with effects of post traumatic stress disorder.

Filming is due to start in the northern spring.

Islands could be ceded to Chile

AS Chairman of the Special Committee on Decolonisation and a citizen of a former British colony, I believe Mr St Aimee may be unmoved by Councillor Short's kind invitation to visit these Islands.

I mean no disrespect, but if we are honest with ourselves our Legislative Assembly has the independence of a Cornish Parish Council.

Our constitution makes it quite clear that Britain's consent is required for every local act of governance.

I'm not a lawyer, but I understand that from the British Settlements Acts supreme powers are reserved to Her Majesty.

In 2009 another British colony experienced the full force of this subjugation when its elected government was suspended and direct rule was imposed by Britain.

Premier Williams of the Turks and Caicos Islands issued a statement accusing the British authorities of "dismantling a duly elected government and legislature and replacing it with a one man dictatorship!"

He felt the territory was being "invaded and recolonised" by Britain (Reuters, 14 Aug 2009).

In fact, it never ceased being a colony and subservient to Westminster.

Closer to London, the province of Northern Ireland has only recently seen self-determination returned to the Stormont Parliament.

Meanwhile, England has not had any self-determination for centuries and remains the only country in Europe without a democratically elected government, unlike its preferentially treated neighbours, Scotland and Wales.

England may have been the "Mother of Parliaments" but she sadly died many years ago.

The United Nations is right to show concern with our feudal and archaic governance. Although the ethnic elite may like it, many are very uneasy.

As mentioned in these columns before, the Chagossians were removed from their homeland in the 1970s by force on the UK's whim, with the British Government supposedly now more concerned about the wellbeing of the Islands' turtles!

Wikileaks reveals that this marine reserve ploy is a deliberate attempt by the duplicitous UK Government to legally block the justified return of the Ilois to their homes. Self-determination, I think not.

Although at present for the Falklands such a move is politi-

cally unlikely, in the future, as these Islands become increasingly settled by South Americans and Oceanics for example, then the UK could, if it wishes, cede them to Chile.

Islanders should recognise, although it may be unfashionable to mention, that the FCO has long accepted Argentina's claim to sovereignty, though not its methods, and self-determination, like the Chagossian turtles, is just so much wind.

I understand the above is very hard for many to accept but I suggest it is worthy of careful thought.

It is certainly being considered by Mr St Aimee!

A tale of tattoos, samba bars and sodden spuds on Saunders

Mike Wagstaff knows more about the psyche of those who patrol the Falklands and the South Atlantic than anyone. But he'll never tell. As a Royal Navy chaplain, his is a complex calling: as counsellor, confidante and Christian colleague to men and women who are, collectively, trained to kill. Tony Curran met the man known as "the Bish" while a guest on HMS Gloucester, and he discovered there is far more beneath his clerical collar than meets the eye...

AFTER almost 20 years in holy orders, Mike Wagstaff already boasted an intriguing CV.

Having graduated through two curacies, he helped oversee a large parish in inner city Leicester, working on community projects involving perpetrators of domestic violence and assisting at a drop-in centre for prostitutes.

Later, he became director of social responsibility in the diocese of Sheffield, before being elevated to the General Synod, the governing body of the Church of England.

But all that was about to change, after a chance meeting with a navy chaplain. It was the day of the Trident debate in the General Synod, and the navy turned up for a lunchtime reception.

"I liked the look of the sandwiches, that's why I went in the first place," says the Bish.

The navy chaplain, who he had met some years before, suggested he join up: "I said I was too old."

"But he said 'no you're not, not any more, we've changed the rules'. So I had no excuse. I went for it."

"I think it was the ecclesiastical equivalent of being hit on the back of the head; waking up in a ship four days out of Portsmouth."

"I was in the Navy within four months. As far as I know I'm the oldest person ever to pass out of Dartmouth."

He very nearly scored a remarkable promotion, too, when the navy's human resources people accidentally made him Chaplain of the Fleet.

But it was short-lived: "It was corrected, and the money was corrected as well, pretty sharpish."

During one of his three trips to the Falklands, he led a special service for the crew of HMS Manchester:

"We laid wreaths in San Carlos Water, not least because the executive warrant officer on that ship had been on the Antelope when she was hit. It was also the anniversary."

There were less solemn moments, too.

"Down in the Falklands I think the funniest ever situation was going over to Saunders Island in the MIB (non-rigid boat)," he says. "It was a rough day. It was blowing a gale, it was wet and we had a paper bag of potatoes we were taking over to Saunders Island. The bag burst and it was so wet our life jackets decided that we'd actually fallen in, and they inflated. So there were the doctor and I, totally helpless with laughter in the bottom of this boat, floating around in potatoes."

"It was totally ridiculous, but we managed to salvage these potatoes on the beach. They weren't wasted. They got to where they needed to go, to the Pole-Evans family."

Aside from conducting church services and ceremonials, and the occasional encounter with sodden spuds, the chaplain's main role is to provide spiritual and other welfare to his crewmates.

"My work is to be somebody who lives and works outside of the command structure," he says.

"So I am somebody who has the time to listen to what anyone has to say, to provide a service that is non-judgmental. In the naval chaplaincy service that is very,

very important. It is also absolutely vital that we are a confidential service.

"We are the only officers in the navy who have a right under Queen's regulations to maintain absolute confidentiality with people that we talk to – and to betray that confidentiality is a very serious misdemeanour."

But I wonder how a man of the cloth can justify his role when he is attached to the armed forces.

"The navy are trained to kill," he says. "I suppose it's our

core activity, except we don't do much of it. You see guns all the time, but you don't really associate them with killing.

"But if they do kill somebody, they may need my support and the support of their colleagues of course in bringing them back from that point at which they did have to kill someone, because it is not a normal activity.

"I find that the matelots on this ship think more deeply about these issues than maybe people would give them credit for.

"They know that killing is a last resort, that using those guns is a last resort and, if they do it, it is for a good reason.

"They do it because they are trained. They are not proud of it, but they are proud of the fact that

we are a disciplined, thoughtful organisation.

"The role of chaplain is important because you are among people at the very edge.

"Even if I was sat at home with my feet up in a comfortable vicarage in the Midlands, these lads are out doing that on my behalf, whether I approve or not. So I am simply nearer that edge."

Soft spoken and an avid reader, one might expect the Bish to be staid and conservative, the personification of his stereotypical contemporaries on land.

But far from it – like the time he celebrated the 20th anniversary of his ordination, while on deployment in Rio.

"Most people have a nice church service with tea and buns to celebrate that sort of thing. I went on a wonderful tour of samba bars with the lads from the ship. It was absolutely magnificent.

"I think I've lived life back to front really," he ponders.

"I was terribly pious as a twenty-something and I've sort of got worse as I've grown older, really."

"I think I'm the only chaplain in the navy with tattoos.

"I have an anchor and the chaplain's emblem on my back, three hares, which is the Celtic symbol of Easter, and a grey lag goose which is the Celtic symbol of the Holy Spirit. They were done back at home.

"The lads did say they would take me for a tattoo in Rio but I politely said no thank you."

He also is not the first member of his family to visit the Falklands. His uncle Doug was stranded on the Islands in 1949.

"He was getting kelp off a propeller somewhere out of Stanley.

"He was a diver off the Bigbury Bay. When he came back to Stanley, they had left him a note: 'Please get next ship.'

"They just left him behind, and he was stuck there for nine months before another ship came for him.

"I think he worked in the abattoir, and he was friendly with Jack and Maud Sollis.

He was a bit of a lad was my uncle Doug, so there may be stories around about him."

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Opportunity knocks at Training Centre doors

HIS Excellency the Governor cut the ribbon to open the Training Centre on Sapper Hill Road on Saturday, with assistance from Christmas elf Jake Hawksworth.

Weather kept the ceremony outside short, and guests moved quickly to the conference room for drinks and a sensational spread by chefs in training Rhys Clifford and Christopher Collins.

"It is a tremendous building with a great list of facilities," said the Governor in his speech.

Manager Eileen Davies said the team effort to get a space dedicated and designed for training had been a "culmination of a dream fulfilled" from nine to ten years in the pipeline.

C&S construction helped refurbish the building which cost around £100,000, including furnishings, investments in equipment and the road and path.

The conference space boasts a new touch screen projectable white board, and the rest of the centre is suitably equipped with a well-lit IT suite, interview room, offices and bathrooms.

Most impressive is the workshop through the next door. The room is split with space to turn wood, practice plumbing on the built-in bathroom display and extra space for electrical and other tinkering and carving.

A kitchen is adjacent to the practical work space for chefs and bakers to hone their skills too. They hope to incorporate a me-

chanics garage in the future. Apprenticeship Coordinator Marcus Morrison said trades were previously taught through theoretical knowledge and reading. Now, thanks to the new workshop, "if they have a question we can show them answers in practice not just theory," he said.

The team hopes the workshops will engage the students and provide more opportunities for evening classes.

The two evening classes running at the moment are felting and woodworking, and the demand for these are high, with a long waiting list for Carol Cant's felting course. Marcus said he had recognised demand for other classes and qualifications in skilled trades such as plumbing, electrical work and cookery, as well as a significant gap in the market for a bricklayer.

He also stressed the need for skilled tradesmen to come forward to help train students: "We've had difficulty in securing them in the past as most work for private firms with unsocial or conflicting hours."

The training budget can't afford full-time tutors or assessors but anyone who gives up their time would be paid.

Success stories are not hard to come by in the centre. Mrs Davies said Maria Biggs was a "shining example of what is achievable through us." Maria decided to pursue a career as a nurse quite late in life but soon achieved NVQ 1 and 2 in nursing and went abroad to train in Cambridge.

Corey Bagley started his apprenticeship while still in school and two years on is still training to be a carpenter.

"The new centre is good because we can learn more skills by doing them and not just reading the theory," he told the Penguin News.

The Training Centre hopes to gather more guests next February when an Internal Verifier from City and Guilds will be joining the team for a short time.





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South Georgia revisited: by Royal Navy destroyer

Twenty-five years ago, South Georgia went it alone. After being catapulted onto the world stage on March 19 1982, when a group of special forces posing as scrap metal merchants hoisted the Argentine flag in Leith Harbour – an act which would lead to bitter and bloody conflict in the Falklands – South Georgia in 1985 ceased to be a dependency of its nearest populated neighbour.

On the anniversary of the island becoming an overseas territory in its own right, Penguin News editor Tony Curran reports on the people who keep its pristine wilderness alive and thriving, the roles present and former Falkland Islanders still play in assisting their sub-Antarctic friends, and what it's like to travel from Stanley to South Georgia... on board the most famous destroyer in the Royal Navy.

An unforgettable voyage to the edge of the world

AN air of poignancy hangs over HMS Gloucester as she patrols the South Atlantic this austral summer. After 28 years service, this is her final tour before she is decommissioned in the New Year. For some of the crew, it is their first trip south. For others, it is one last visit that is bound to stir the emotions, particularly when they return to South Georgia, the highlight of her deployment 12 months ago. This is the story of that voyage; not merely an account of life on board the Gloucester, but also of the remarkable people who greeted the ship's arrival in Grytviken. Tony Curran reports...

FRIDAY

A dull, low-lying cloud drags its tired body across the sky. It's a little like how I feel at the moment, having stolen next to no sleep overnight. But, if anything is going to jolt my senses, it's the sight of the Senior Magistrate of the Falklands knocking on my door at 7am.

"Ahoj there," says a beaming John Trevaskis, and we clamber into our taxi for the dawn drive to Mare Harbour.

John and I are among five civilians and 16 military folk invited to join HMS Gloucester – a Type 42 destroyer known affectionately as the Fighting G – for an 11-day patrol to South Georgia. And, from the moment we are piped aboard, we find ourselves in a different world.

Commander Iain Lower presents an overview of our trip: "The ship's got a job to do; it's an operational patrol for us," he says. "We are going right out on a limb, on the edge of the Joint Operating Area." And, he warns us: "Once we cross the Antarctic Convergence Zone, the world changes."

It is at that point when the surface temperature of the ocean can plummet three degrees in a matter of minutes. But, before we go anywhere, we are ushered into the junior officers' mess for a safety briefing.

We learn every member of the ship's company is trained in firefighting and basic first aid. We learn meal times, emergency evacuation procedures, navy speak for ordinary English, and where to go if we have a Titanic moment.

"There are 16 25-man life rafts on the upper deck," one officer tells us, more than enough for the 268 on board. "And we have big orange survival suits if the shit hits the fan."

We learn what to do if we spot an emergency incident: we perform an LVA (that's Loud Vocal Alarm in jack speak). In other words, if we see a man overboard, we are advised: "Just shout 'man overboard.' And remember to shout three times."

We learn how not to get lost: "If you're on two deck, you're on the Burma Way. It's the only deck which goes right around the ship. So if you don't know where you are, keep walking around. Once you pass the drink machine three times, stop and ask someone."

All this flashes past our eyes and ears during our first two hours on board. Shortly after 10am I'm on the starboard bridge wing, and Iain asks our assembly with a huge grin: "Shall we go then? Shall we go to South Georgia?"

The jackstaff is lowered from the bow, and the sea ensign is raised on the main mast; we're on our way.

Full steam ahead to the sub Antarctic

First up, or rather from port to starboard, is a demonstration of the ship's pitch and roll. We list five degrees from side to side, and the bridge inclines accordingly. Then the engines are pushed into reverse, and we witness the unusual sight of a swell emerging from beneath the keel and out under the bow. It's designed to bring us to a full stop, from where we power up to 30-plus knots from a standing start.

"This isn't just for display," says Iain. "We're stressing the system. We're testing the tolerance of the engines, carrying out vibration tests."

Yesterday the system was stressed in a different way, as the Gloucester underwent an exercise to mimic the real-life grounding of the Nottingham off Australia.

"It was a disaster," says Iain. "We had the ship on fire, casualties, two dead. It was great."

Iain retains a huge fondness for the Gloucester, as it nears the end of its life: "She was 27 last week," he says, patting the bulkhead. "She's not old. She's in her prime."

Lunch is served in the wardroom, my new home from home, followed by a DVD screening of South Georgia's attractions – and the do's and don'ts within that pristine environment.

The screening is interrupted part way through with an LVA via the ship's speakers: "Casualty, casualty, casualty." It's not a drill, and three officers exit in a hurry, emergency medical equipment cradled under their arms.

Later on, as I'm chatting with the doctor in sick bay, I learn it was one of the junior ratings who had passed out. He was paying the price for a rather big night on the grog after the aforementioned exercise.

Lieutenant Commander Duggie Ward is my minder for the trip, and he delights in

showing me as much as he can. This afternoon we visit the ship's store, with steel boxes housing every manner of electrical and mechanical spare part. Duggie reckons some of them go back to supplies from the 1950s, and the whole lot is worth close to £1 million.

I also am invited to watch the Lynx helicopter take off for an exercise flight. I return 20 minutes later to watch pilot Paul Irving land, with Flight Commander Joe Harper navigating by his side. They do so at their second attempt, having aborted the first owing to the crosswind. The flight deck crew then unties the missiles from their moorings, practising loading and unloading, and does the same with the depth charge.

Later, as I spend my first evening at sea at the Captain's table, together with the other four civvies on board, we offer our host our grateful thanks for an exciting and illuminating day – and an upcoming adventure that none of us will ever forget.

SATURDAY

My bunk in a six-berth cabin is surprisingly comfortable, and I'm not in the slightest perturbed at the rolling of the vessel as my head and feet take it in turns to occupy the high ground.

But it's my feet that get a real workout today as Duggie takes me on a full tour of the ship. One of the five heads of department who report directly to the captain, Duggie is also a lean, mean talking machine, and I learn much about some of the behind-the-scenes operations, and take a peek at some of the less visited areas of the ship.

The Gloucester has a similar layout to an aircraft carrier, with the engines in the central core, and two deck serving as the ring main.

Much of it appears to be an organised mess of cladded pipes, fire hose reels, escape kits, buttons, bells, all manner of electrical panels – and huge blocks of four-by-four strapped alongside the bulkhead.

It turns out they use these great hulks of wood to literally batten down the hatches should the below decks become flooded, and to construct dwarf bulkheads to stop loose water moving from port to starboard, one of the biggest dangers to safe navigation in the event of a flood.

Inside the bow I can feel the vibrations as the keel slices through the water. This is also home for the bosun's reel store, where the main cable for the 1800kg anchor comes rattling through. Contrary to popular belief, I learn it's not the anchor that steadies the ship in open water, but the tension of the cable.

We pass a few more offices and work rooms, each making the most of the tight space available. Peer around one corner, and there's an escape hatch. Peer around another, and it's the stairwell into the Sea Dart missile room.

Poke your eyes into a third space the size of a broom cupboard, and there's a rating gazing at a computer screen. If you were to pull out one of the desk drawers, you'd probably find a mattress inside.

It's how the economy of space has been utilised that impresses, and Douggie talks it all up: "This is actually quite spacious," he says. But then a colleague reminds him: "Once a submariner, always a submariner."

HQ1 is one of the many sections for which Douggie is responsible, the team that fights what he calls the "internal battle" in times of strife, be they internal accidents or disasters that are imposed on within from outside. But the Ops Room is where the Gloucester takes on the enemy head-to-head. No one is allowed to sit in the Captain's seat on the bridge, but Douggie allows me to sit in the real seat of power below decks: the Captain's console, from where he would fight his war should the Gloucester be drawn into conflict.

Nathan King is one of the guys on duty here, an Engineering Technician in the Marine Engineering department. I guess that means he's good with fixing things that go wrong.

But I'm more impressed with how he puts up with spending his off-duty hours in 42-man quarters with triple-deck bunks, and a mess square the equivalent of a rec room that can barely seat half of them.

"I don't mind it," says Nathan. "I've spent eight years in mess decks like this. But it can get noisy at night." After lights out, most of his mates are playing music and watching DVDs on their laptops.

My tour ends at the bridge, the area of the ship with which I am already becoming familiar; not merely because I've already made frequent visits, but because from here I can most easily get my bearings and know roughly where I'm headed. And it is here I'm introduced to quartermaster AB (Able Bodied seaman) Adam Drozdowski.

"We call him Scrabble," says Douggie, "because he's worth 67 points."

"Actually it's 129 points, sir," says Adam, matter-of-factly. And I'm astonished to find the 21-year-old at the helm.

"Why don't you sit in the driver's seat?" Douggie asks, displaying what appears to me a surprisingly relaxed attitude to the protocol through which he has climbed, and that upon

which service life revolves: "It's OK, it's on automatic pilot."

There's a steering column much like on a small plane or a racing car – today's version of the old ship's wheel – and it is this which persuades the bow where to point.

I have to hand it to these ship designers. They certainly put the bridge in a good spot.

My guide is mightily proud of the Gloucester, and in particular its battle honours from 1991, when it became the only warship to successfully take out an incoming missile in combat, an Iraqi Scersucker during the Gulf War: "The missile wasn't heading for us, it was heading for an American warship. But we know we have a battle-proven system," he says.

Backed up with a frighteningly powerful 4.5 inch Mk 8 gun, and the Stingray torpedo-wielding Lynx helicopter, the crown jewels of its impressive armaments array, she makes a formidable foe: "Pilots don't like flying against Type 42s," says Douggie, "because we're designed to take them out."

We won't see a shot fired in anger during this patrol but, he says, "we will demonstrate that we have the ability and the capability, the means and the methods to deploy a military force." "We will also be assisting the South Georgia Government and BAS on a number of issues they have specifically asked us to do, and we have EOD guys on board who are going to help clear some of the explosive ordnance they have recently uncovered."

"The very presence of a warship is reassurance, to see friendly faces as it were. A lot of it is hearts and mind stuff. It lets them know that people back home are thinking of them. It's also an opportunity for our guests and the ship's company to go ashore and see one of the most spectacular, wild remote places on the planet."

So Douggie leaves me after our whirlwind circuit of life below decks, and he leaves me with an iconic image in my mind's eye. Part way through the tour we come upon a couple of junior ratings sorting through a box of bananas for the galley. Douggie grabs one, and it remains in his hand as he leads me through the ops rooms.

As he issues an instruction to another rating, I feel obliged to interrupt: "You'd better do as he says," I warn Douggie's charge. "You can't argue with a senior officer when he's pointing a banana at you."

I learn we have just entered the Atlantic Convergence Zone and, as sure as Iain predicted, the surface temperature of the ocean has slipped from four to one degrees in less than an hour.

The bigger picture, though, reveals that this watery isthmus is slowly moving south, and bringing with it all manner of oceanographic change. Its uppermost edge has moved 45 miles in recent times, and it is now only 200 miles from our destination.

That means the krill will move on and, as most resident Antarctic wildlife is connected to the krill feeding chain in one way or the other, then every living thing below latitude 60 degrees will be rather dramatically affected.

Lt Jason Allen and I muse over the issue of environmental change in the wake of global warming, and we both know only too well we're about to witness a part of the planet which, in just a few generations' time, will never be quite the same again.

"When the Convergence Zone reaches South Georgia, it will change everything," says

HAROLD Wilson had resigned as Britain's Prime Minister and a band called U2 was getting together when Morecambe-born Joe Harper was earning his sea legs in 1976.

Now, for the first time, the Flight Commander of HMS Gloucester finds himself returning to the island he helped liberate in 1982.

"I came down on HMS Plymouth," he says. "The submarine Santa Fe was just leaving Grytviken harbour on April 25 when we were called to do a missile strike on it. I was leading air crewman at the time so I was the WASP missile aimer. That was the first action of the whole South Atlantic war.

"Once we'd gone through that phase I was then involved in putting Special Forces ashore. We took on board Alfredo Astiz, who was commander of the Argentine forces, so he could sign the surrender of South Georgia.

"Obviously, we were satisfied with the outcome. It didn't take very long and it was done efficiently and effectively."

The Plymouth then joined the Task Force in San Carlos Water: "Most of the combat I had was manning the guns on the ship when I wasn't flying.

"I hadn't seen action before. We never thought the Argentines would actually attack, but when they did we thought it would all be sorted out when we got there. When it wasn't, we just went in and did what we were trained to do.

"The atmosphere was professional; we were in high spirits, really. Morale was high, but there was always that bit of anticipation."

The Plymouth was attacked by fighters on a daily basis, and sustained the most damage on June 8, the same day as the Sir Galahad was hit, when it took five bombs from Skyhawks. One struck a depth charge, blowing a hole in the flight deck and setting fire to the compartment below. Remarkably, no one was killed.

Joe was mentioned in dispatches for preventing a second depth charge from exploding, as flames threatened to engulf it: "That really marked the end of our war to a certain degree," he says. "We patched ourselves up, and then we escorted the Glamorgan back to the UK.

"When the war had ended we felt we'd done a good job and it was time to go home. This has been my first trip to Grytviken since then. It was nice to come back, and visualise what happened at the time. And, of course, it was the first time I managed to get ashore as well. That did give me a certain amount of satisfaction."

THE Falklands War left an indelible impression on Lt Jason "Darbs" Allen.

"My enduring memory was that of the Royal Marine walking down off Wireless Ridge with the Union Flag flying from his radio. From that day, at 12 years old, I wanted to join the Royal Marines."

He did, but an accident forced him to change his plans: "I transferred to the navy on March 4 1988 and I've never looked back," said Brummie-born Darbs.

"It was the Falklands that inspired me. There wasn't really much for children of the eighties I suppose, apart from music, funny haircuts and dodgy fashion."

"My father and both my grandfathers were in the navy, and we can trace the family all the way back to the roll of honour on HMS Victory, to a master gunnery sergeant. So for me, I suppose, it's always been in the blood."

Making Warrant Officer One at the young age of 32, Darbs is on his third deployment to the Falklands, having carried out operational assurance visits and naval gunfire support on the range in Falklands Sound.

"I was here in '89, '99 and now 2009," he says. "I think the biggest change for me has been Stanley, it has grown incredibly. When I came down in the '80s the Falklands conflict was still very much in everybody's minds. In the '90s I think it dipped away. Now it seems to have gone full circle. I think the families of the fallen ceremony reignited a bit of a spark."

His father-in-law was a Marine, and counted Pete King among his best friends. Through that connection, Darbs, 39, met Pete and Arlette's daughters Cherilyn and Michelle, and Michelle's partner Andy: "I've been ashore with them a few times and had a few drinks with them at the Globe and the Victory Bar," he says.

"The Falklands is quite special for me. You meet some fantastic people. You just grow to love the place. People don't seem to get flustered by anything. They are casual and chatty, very friendly."

"You can see why people raise children here and why families who have moved away want to come back to raise children here. It is a lovely place."

But why the nickname? After more than 20 years, he says, he still has no idea how it originated: "It's quite frustrating really. Everyone in the navy who is called Allen has the nickname Darby. It's just a name that sticks with you. The funny thing is I've been friends with people all these years and some of them still don't know my Christian name. They still call me Darbs. How daft is that?"

Jason, better known as Darbs. Later I return to the flight deck, and watch a £14 million piece of military kit take off against the fading sky on its icewatch flight.

The Lynx skips 90 miles ahead of us on a dusk recce, returning an hour later to confirm the ocean is clear of hazards.

After scoffing a delightful evening meal comprising a rather thick and juicy steak, and chips which don't come too many to the pound, the entire dinner party adjourns to watch the Shackleton DVD.

I'm writing right through the film and beyond, and from 11pm AB Kurt Cudjoe, one of the stewards, is my only company as he makes up the table for tomorrow's meals: "I'm a junior. The most junior junior," he smiles.

He began his first shift at 5.30am, and he'll do the same after he goes to bed at around 12.30am. I ask him if he gets paid more for working longer shifts: "Well, I get an extra £6 a day when I'm at sea," he says. "The shifts balance out. You get used to the hours. It's the weeks you count, not the hours."

And Kurt counts himself fortunate to be here. He left his home country of Trinidad where many of his friends were impoverished: "I'm one of the lucky ones," he says. "Some people might not think this is a great job, but you make the most of your chances. I'm making the most of mine."

Around midnight I make my way to the bridge wing. The moon casts a spooky glare over the black glassy sea, and a dark figure leans against the wing beside me. It's the Captain, and we chat for 20 minutes, both mesmerised by the view before us of this great grey hulk ploughing through the water under the watchful gaze of the silvery moon.

We discuss the roles in which we have found ourselves and, although our professional duties are quite different, we share similar passions for our respective careers. A switch flicks on and we chat like old buddies over a beer in a pub, except we're gazing towards the Antarctic, soaking in every cold and magical moment.

I return to my cabin, but I've been invigorated by my chat with Iain. It may be late, but my brain is buzzing, and I want to find some more company. I return upstairs at 1am: "Editor on the bridge," I announce.

Darbs is Officer Watch tonight, and I chat with his charges in the dark. For some reason I didn't expect the bridge to be in blackout mode, but it makes sense, of course. My eyes are tested futher when a young crewman on icewatch on the bridge wing hands me his binoculars. I see a pale green petrel duck under a bright green bow, as the clouds jostle across sky beneath a shiny green moon. Yep, it's absolutely true what they say about night vision goggles.

SUNDAY

The day is bright, sunny and fresh, and the South Atlantic is doing its best impersonation of a millpond. Conditions below the surface have been remarkably good too. We hopped onto the back of a fast moving current overnight, and we're making swift progress.

"It's a big day today," I say to Navigator, Lieutenant Pete Ware (Navs to the crew, Tupper to his mates). "It's Chelsea against United."

But Navs isn't thinking of the football match. He tells me we'll be dropping anchor in Grytviken at 7.30pm tonight, at least 12 hours ahead of schedule.

When I discover we also have to put our clocks forward an hour this afternoon, I realise time is flying faster than I want it to.

I attend another briefing in the junior ratings mess, where we are advised of the extreme environmental and biosecurity precautions we must take before disembarking in South Georgia - and the extreme weather, where an innocuous breeze can transform instantly into a frighteningly powerful gust.

"And bear in mind there is no search and rescue here, apart from us," says Paul Irving. "So if we have a problem we have to sort ourselves out. There's no one within 800 miles that can come and get us."

The lure of the approaching island is fast becoming irresistible and, for the next two or three hours, I'm with the remainder of the guests and a growing number of the ship's company out on deck.

We are soaking up the remarkable vista: the starkness of the snow-capped mountains rising from the steel-grey sea, the cloud formations wrestling for dominance in the sky, some of them swooping towards the mountain tops as if a flock of seabirds are targeting their ocean prey, and the majestic glaciers which,

over the millennia, have slid inexorably towards the ice-pitted waters.

All the while, we're getting closer, and soon the red roofs of Grytviiken slip into view, as we turn into Cumberland Bay. They are dwarfed by the surrounding peaks, and the sun seems to power itself up one last time to illuminate the bay as we drop anchor. Then the temperature plummets.

The guardians of Grytviiken are making their point. We're in their territory now, and we have to accept whatever weather they throw at us. So far, it has been immaculate, at least by Antarctic fringe standards. But we're warned to be prepared for anything before we go ashore. From our anchorage we watch Grytviiken fade into the dusk, and I begin to get ready for my 36-hour stopover.

After dinner I must find something to secure my wash bag outside the wardroom for laundry collection in the morning.

"Take this," says Darbs, as he hands me a thick reel of packing tape. "This is what we tie the young midshipmen up with when they're annoying us."

MONDAY

South Georgia Government Officer Pat Lurcock briefs the ship's senior officers in the wardroom at 8.30am.

He reiterates the biosecurity regulations in a shipwide broadcast from the bridge, reminding the crew that Grytviiken is a place with no cafe, no public toilets and nowhere to buy food or drink - all of which contributes towards the territory being one of the most unspoilt places on earth.

My boat comes in at 9.30am, and I'm zipped up on the quarterdeck in a one-piece rubber suit from neck to toe.

"Now I know what it feels like to be an elephant seal," I say, as I squeeze into this horribly heavy-duty skin. Of course, it's there to help me should I fall overboard and, when I see the boat in which I'm going to cross the harbour, I can understand why.

I'm not being ferried across on the government patrol boat, but on the ship's ribbed runaround, where two passengers sit behind the driver, and the rest cling on to the ropes for dear life.

Thankfully I'm right behind the driver, although I can't see a thing. A snow squall has struck, and it's driving into our faces. It's cold, wet, windy and wild. And it doesn't help that we have to tug ourselves out of our rubber suits at King Edward Point jetty, out in the open.

By the time I catch up with Pat in the boatshed, I'm like a water rat in a giant condom, drenched from the inside out.

He escorts me to Government House, or at least its equivalent, where I am billeted for the night, and where his wife Sarah offers me the freedom of the kitchen: "Everything is where you'd expect it," she says. "Just help yourself."

A king penguin is out for a stroll, and a handful of fur seals are snoozing on the path. At the front of the building, an elephant seal is shielding her pup from the bitter cold.

I make my way along the track which skirts the harbour, linking KEP base to Grytviiken. But to describe it even as a settlement would be a gross overstatement: only three or four people sleep on that side of the harbour during the peak summer season.

Aside from the remains of the whaling station, which closed in 1964, the only other buildings of note are the museum and a small hydro plant. But the penguins and seals are scattered throughout, claiming whatever ground they wish.

At the museum shop, the manager is behind the counter, selling everything from t-shirts to key rings, signed prints to mock scrimshaw embossed pen knives.

"You must be Ainslie," I say, and her face lights up. Ainslie Wilson is a bright and cheery Kiwi, with a flash of windswept red hair. She and I have been exchanging emails pre-visit and it's good to finally catch up face-to-face.

She introduces me to taxidermist Steve Massam, who is here from Stanley for six weeks. His workshop upstairs is a clutter of stuffed animals, sketches, half-finished moulds and empty coffee cups.

"My work is about 50-50 taxidermy and souvenirs," he says. "I make artificial bronzes of elephant seals, and I have a lifesize bust of a black browed albatross. The guys at BAS keep their eyes out for specimens for me."

He also is working on an ambitious project likely to occupy him for the next two or three summer seasons: the first scale model of the whaling station, based on plans taken from the 1950s and 60s.

"At the moment I'm producing sets of drawings of the buildings," he says. "There were 48 in all. Obviously now the station has been cleaned up, but the tourists will be able to see the station as it was, when it was at its peak. I'm doing it to a 200:1 scale, and the model will end up being 2m by 1.5m."

"I'm very fortunate that the Falklands Museum lets me come down here. It's like a big family. We all pull together."

They all eat and drink together, too, and we join the other girls - Elsa Davidson, the museum's 28-year-old curator, and her assistant Bridget Steed - for a bowl of soup in the staff kitchen. Then a face of a new found friend pops his head up at the window: "All right if we call in for a cuppa?"

Pat has spent the morning with three members of the EOD team, bomb disposal experts who have come down with the Gloucester to remove some suspicious objects left lying around on the hills. A number of shells and various pockets of ammunition are still scattered around the place, left behind by UK forces post '82 when, for a few years, South Georgia was a military garrison.

Suitably warmed up, I take a look outside and realise the weather is clearing up, so it's time to play follow-my-camera.

I peer in and among the relics of this whaling life: rusted giant cogs, buildings held up by steel wires, oil drums the size of gas towers, and all manner of industrial artifacts.

Yet, even here, dotted along the shoreline, elephant seals are taking a dip or a snooze on the shale beach.

I see a few figures from the ship climbing a steep snowy incline, and decide to follow their tracks. On the way down I almost fall over a huddle of king penguins.

And there's more besides: the grey hulks of elephant seals and their pups, fur seals recently arrived to prepare for mating, small groups of king penguins on walkabout almost everywhere you look, and all this before I reach Shackleton's grave in the whalers' cemetery.

The weather here, though, is not always quite so accommodating. For an hour or two the sun honours us with its presence, and Cumberland Bay lights up under a rich blue sky. Then, as if from nowhere, a 50-knot gust threatens to tip me over. It's wild weather indeed but, more to the point, unpredictably wild weather.

I quickly find shelter in the museum, where Elsa's captivating Scottish accent is brimming with enthusiasm.

She's a long way from her Orkney Islands home, but she has hardly looked back since applying for the position with the South Georgia Heritage Trust, the Dundee-based organisation dedicated to promoting the conservation and protection of the island and its heritage.

"Quite a few people from Orkney and the Shetlands travelled down here with Christian Salvesen (the British company scrapping the whaling stations) and went to Leith and Stromness to work, so there was a bit of history from home," she tells me.

"I also have an interest in polar history and, when this position came up for seven months, I just thought it was an excellent period of time to see if it was something I would really enjoy."

Now in her fourth season, the attraction of living and working in one of the most remote places on earth hasn't waned.

"You can feel quite isolated," she says. "But you soon get used to it. And it's just such an amazing experience when you look out your

bedroom window and you've got elephant seal pups outside that have just weaned, and then you go out the front and there are penguins outside your door.

"You feel very privileged to be here. It's quite special sometimes."

Elsa is documenting the museum collection online for the first time, and is looking forward to working on an oral history project with former whalers.

"There's generally four of us here at the museum, so we work quite closely together, but the atmosphere is really, really good. We tend to gel pretty well, and we don't really want for anything.

"We've got loads of frozen and tinned supplies, and fresh comes in once a month. But I do miss Aberdeen Angus steak. I come from a beef farm!"

Back at my temporary lodgings, I chat with Pat and Sarah over dinner. When he first worked on the island in 1992, Pat tells me, he visited only 20 ships in four months. He can now add to that dozens more fishing vessels, private yachts and up to 70 cruise ships offloading up to 8,000 passengers.

"We inspect every fishing vessel to make sure they are set up to fish legally, brief the captain, go through the rules and regulations, explain the haul-by-haul reports they have to submit, and make sure they are set up to fish within all the conservation measures."

"With the cruise ships and yachts we go on board and do the customs clearances, issue invoices for the harbour fees and visitor fees,

and make sure that they have gone through all the biosecurity requirements.

"We make sure the staff understand what's necessary for guiding people ashore and what we're trying to protect, and why and how."

The protection even extends to some of the smallest living creatures on the planet: "We have two different currents, one from the Weddell Sea and one coming through Drake Passage, which mix a whole lot of different nutrients and bring it to the surface," says Pat.

"It's like a big nutritious soup for plankton, and everything that eats plankton upwards, so it's a very productive area here, just on the boundary of the warm world and the cold world."

And just when he thinks it's safe to go out of the water, he's back on it: "When you're here you're on duty the whole time," he says.

"Things are always happening. Golden Fleece came in at 6pm tonight, just as we'd sat down, relaxed and thought that was the end of the day. So I popped round and briefed him."

Sarah worked at FIBS and for a short time at the Penguin News while the couple were living in the Falklands, shortly before moving to South Georgia.

"I was supporting Pat in his role," she says. "He used to be deputy postmaster, so if he was busy I would just take that side of things over. His job has changed beyond all recognition since then, but even after all these years I have still only built myself up a part-time role."

Nevertheless, life on the island is as irresistible now as it has ever been, says Sarah.

"It's a combination of lots of things. I still really look forward to spring when the birds return. We know the date we're going to see the first skua return, or the light-mantled sooty or the first time you hear the white-chinned petrels calling on the hillside.

"I still get a thrill from that, and I love the elephant seal colonies right on the doorstep. Sometimes the fur seals will literally be on the doorstep, and we have to use a different entrance because you can't go that way!

"I was here this morning in the post office and three penguins walked past. I don't think I'll ever get over that.

"And, because there are normally 12 of us here through the winter, this isn't so much a community as a family. For the base to work everybody has to work towards it, whatever it is, whether it is the catering or the boating. Everyone is contributing."

TUESDAY

After an overnight white out, Grytviken's tiny Norwegian wood built chapel almost fades into the snowy slopes of the mountains behind.

The ship's chaplain, Mike Wagstaff, known universally as the Bish, is leading a service of remembrance, and I take my spot in the second pew behind CBF Gordon Moulds. Almost every resident of Grytviken is here, with dozens of officers, crew and guests from the ship.

Tiny whisps of condensation float from 150 mouths as the prayers and hymns echo around the ancient timber frame.

Stoker Douglas Clutterbuck has given himself a lightning lesson in how to play the pipe organ, and how to play the extended version of God Save The Queen.

But, as he pedals the bellows into the second verse, a hush descends on the congregation.

"I thought I'd made a massive mistake," he tells me later. "Everyone just seemed to stop. I felt like all eyes were on me for a minute, then I looked up at the chaplain and he said cut it out there, so I just ended it.

"It's quite shocking that the Royal Navy's frontline warship doesn't know the second verse to the national anthem, isn't it?"

Back at the museum, I catch up with Brian Summers. He is here from Stanley for only a couple of weeks to conduct a weed-killing exercise as part of an EU-funded invasive species programme. But, as the weather has closed in, he's drinking more coffee than he had planned.

"South George is actually magical," he says. "Waking up to the view out over the bay and the mountains is just such a magical thing. Really special. And there's the history that comes with it."

Brian first visited the island in 1970, working as the radio operator: "I was here with Mike Summers' brother Owen, who was the met man, so there were nine of us in all that winter. It was the year when people like Jan Cheek's parents were down here, Basil and Betty. Basil was the policeman."

He returned for the first time two years ago: "I was really quite surprised how emotional it was. I hadn't been here for 38 years. It was I think disappointing to see the state of things.

"When I was here before Grytviken had a caretaker, and everything was maintained. The snow was swept off the ships every morning.

"To come back and see everything in ruins, almost, was sad. But they've done a good job since. It's tidy, people can walk around in safety, and you don't have to worry about asbestos."

I buy a few souvenirs and farewell Ainslie before returning to KEP, the BAS base towards the mouth of the bay. Such has been the

warmth of these guys, even over such a short period, a goodbye hug comes naturally.

I join the BAS team just before 1pm, sidestepping the usual clutches of kings on the track, and the lolloping elephant and fur seals on the shoreline. A few pups are playing in a little pool by the stubby tussac, and they each cast their eyes in my direction as I walk past.

Inside the BAS base most of the crew is taking a break for lunch. Cooking duties today are being shared by medical officer Angy Jones and her successor Sue Woodward, who is replacing her in a couple of weeks. Straight away the girls offer me a coffee and a bacon and cheese slice.

Base Commander Tom Marshall, his soon-to-be-successor Ali Massey and scientist Jon Ashburner are sitting around the table. Boating officer Paula O'Sullivan is flitting in and out between the base and the boatshed and, for the next few hours, I am invited to share a glimpse of their world.

Teamwork and dedication are the keys to surviving this rarified lifestyle, and the BAS team boasts both by the bucketload.

It's not just the work or the wildlife, nor is it the inescapably wondrous scenery or the all-powerful climate. It's not their shared passions for walking, skiing and climbing, nor is it the devotion they apply to conservation, ecology and preservation.

And it's not merely the tremendous sense of camaraderie which builds between like-minded colleagues patched together in this sub-Antarctic wilderness. Somewhere between and beyond those lines is the answer, but to hazard a simplistic guess would be puerile. Suffice to say, whatever it is, it works.

After a final chat with Pat, I complete my packing, fill in the visitors' book and, in no time at all, I'm suited up in latex, zipped to the gills and slipped onto the boat.

It's hard to take my eyes off Grytviken as we pull away, dodging through the thousands of mini-growlers that are threatening to ice up the inner harbour. And it's difficult to avoid clichés at such times – but I would dearly like to come back at some stage; not just for the place, but for the people.

After dinner, I share a beer with the Bish in the wardroom, and he meanders a little after we recall this morning's service: "I think national anthems are a bit like military uniforms," he says. "The flashier they are the more dodgy the country. Ours is quite plain.

"Norway has two, even though one of them is a direct translation of ours. They sing that one when the king is around. The other one is just about how nice Norway is.

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Ainslie Wilson

SOUTH Georgia Museum manager Ainslie Wilson, 44, says she has traded one paradise for another since swapping the beaches of Golden Bay, near Nelson in New Zealand, for the rugged, raw beauty of the South Atlantic.

And it was thanks to a three year posting in the Falklands from 1998-2000, during which she worked as a teacher and shared a house with Emma Jones, that she developed contacts on the island, eventually being invited to run the Post Office on a part-time basis.

"To live here is to be completely away from all the pressures of society," she says.

"There's no phone, no petrol station and no shops, so I don't carry money. We've got 24-hour a day satellite internet but, other than that, there's none of those society things that drive you mad."

And, surprisingly, the social life is hectic: "We have one lounge where everybody gravitates to, so even if there's nothing officially planned we still spend all evening chatting or playing games.

"Saturday night is our whole base get-together, a three-course meal served up on a rota system, and then there are always birthdays. We just find any reason to make something happen.

"The summer season is really busy because of all the cruise ships, and any cruise ship that is in for an evening will invite us on board. The passengers are really excited to meet some locals, but you very rarely get the chance to eat your dinner because you're talking all the time answering questions.

"It's so social, sometimes you just crave the time to go home to your little room and have an early night!"

And sometimes the socialising can lead to something a little more serious: "There have been some interesting romances over the years. South Georgia is known as Love Island. A few relationships do come off, and I think there have been two weddings of people who met here.

"When you have men and women together for even just six months there are going to be relationships, and it can get difficult when they break up of course, because it's such a small group. But you just have to hope that everybody is grown up enough to be able to deal with it."

Her only regret, though, is that her parents can't share her good fortune: "I would dearly love my mum and dad to be able to come and visit me here, but they can't, so they have to live it through me.

"That's the only thing that's disappointing. Everything else is fantastic. This is my dream job."

South Georgia revisited...





Pat Lurcock

IT was when he graduated from Aston University in 1985 that Pat Lurcock saw a life-changing advert in *New Scientist* magazine for the British Antarctic Survey.

"It just leapt out at me," he says. "I didn't know anything about the Antarctic, and I didn't think for a moment I'd get it."

"I wasn't the big rusty-tufted bearded outdoors type. I was just a fairly lazy student. But I got the job and went south for two years as an electronics technician."

Pat went on to work at the BAS base in Halle, married Sarah, joined the fisheries department in Stanley and, in 1992, took up his first stint in South Georgia issuing fishing licences.

It was an island towards which he had been drawn a few years earlier, during a couple of brief stopovers in the late 1980s: "Even in those days I'd just fallen in love with the place, as everyone does when you come here," he says. "It's just so fantastic."

Now, Pat and Sarah have become almost as much a part of South Georgia as the remarkable flora and fauna which surrounds them.

Pat meets every boat, briefs their captains and ensures all regulations are met, from daily reports of trawler catches to harbour fees and customs clearance for the cruise ships and yachts.

"It's all very much about getting them inside," he says. "Making sure people understand what we're trying to protect, and why and how."

As government officer, working eight months on and four months off, his efforts also make a large contribution to South Georgia's £4 million annual revenue.

"I feel very much that I'm part of something that's producing very, very good results in an area that I've come to care about," he says.

"I'm not just a tiny cog in a massive great machine. I have the satisfaction of knowing over the years I have played a significant part in the reduction of the albatross mortality, simply by doing the fishing inspections we do, and by raising the standard of environmental behaviour."

"When I first started doing this I wasn't very interested in wildlife or ecology. I just wanted to be on a motorbike burning hydrocarbons and going as fast as I could. But when you've lived with this right under your nose all the time it becomes special, and when you go away there's something wrong about penguins not walking up the high street!"

"This is how life should be – sharing a planet with all the other species. And we're able to do that, as well as make a difference in managing it and protecting it."

"But they do make a decent flat-pack church in Norway. The one in Grytviken has been up since 1913."

As the Gloucester steams away, I make my final visit to the bridge at 1am. We're cruising through the freezing water at just one knot (about 1.2 mph) to minimise the risk of hitting a lump of ice. It's not necessarily the size of the ice that dictates its threat. Some of the smaller growlers have compacted over thousands of years to a point where they are as tough as iron. And there are plenty out there.

Fortunately, they are well distant. The larger ones show up on the radar, but the ice watch guys are earning their keep on both bridge wings tonight.

And there's something hypnotic about being on the bridge in the middle of the night, with a deep blue-grey haze casting its shadow over the snow-covered deck, as we crawl at a snail's pace on the edge of the Antarctic.

WEDNESDAY

We're heading towards Drygalski Fjord but, unfortunately, the weather isn't cooperating. An icy white curtain has descended to within a couple of hundred metres, and visibility at sea level isn't much better. After half an hour, Iain decides we may as well reverse course and head back up the coast to Gold Harbour.

Those of us scheduled to fly in the Lynx are summoned to the hangar for a briefing.

Joe is checking the names off the list and gives mock short shrift to one of the latecomers, the perennially cheerful rating Mike "Happy Feet" Logan: "I don't want your excuses, AB Logan, as pathetic as they might be."

After half an hour, we consider ourselves briefed, and as prepared as we ever will be should we tip into the water. At a little over one degree above freezing, survival time is less than three minutes.

After lunch four of us are summoned to the flight deck, trussed up in bright orange suits, top-of-the-range issue lifejackets and comms helmets with dual visors. And then we wait.

But after about an hour we're stood down, and I adjourn to the wardroom, where the Bish, the Doc Gordon Irvine, Joe and Dougie are among a handful of officers making the most of some rare down time. Conversation is relaxed, informative, friendly, and rather candid. Such is the welcome that has been extended to us by the crew, the conversation is as genuine as we're likely to witness without wearing the navy blues ourselves.

They may be disconnected subjects, but they are hugely entertaining. And when we veer towards the issue of carbon footprints, I

learn the navy doesn't exactly set the best example with its flagship aircraft carrier the *Ark Royal*: "Apparently it does three quarters of an inch to the gallon," says the Bish.

Inevitably, the subject of alcohol rears its head, and Joe is the target of a little friendly fire from his shipmates.

"I've estimated we'll have 12 days on the way back to UK," says the XO, second-in-command Lieutenant Commander James Stride. "And we have only 14 cases of Old Speckled Hen."

It's Joe's beer of choice, and he pauses for a swift piece of mental arithmetic: "That might just be enough," he says. "But only just."

The Doc looks forlornly at Joe: "It's too late. I can't salvage him."

The Bish bounces back to tell us he has had a less than satisfactory response from the *Church News*, to whom he has sent an article and photo about the service of remembrance at Grytviken.

The image he chose is a delightful one of himself in his black and white robes, wearing a poppy, standing next to a group of king penguins, set against the snowy backdrop of the foothills.

"They've emailed me back to say it doesn't look enough like a remembrance day picture," he says. "What do they want me to do? Throw a wreath around the neck of one of the penguins?"

Wednesday night is curry night on the Gloucester. All of us are exceedingly well fed and satisfied, and the banter continues after dinner, demonstrating the rather wonderful camaraderie that has broken out among the guests and our hosts.

Later, I wander up to the bridge for one of my late night sorties. It's the clearest night so far, and the milky way paints a glittering roof

over our heads. And yet again, perched on the bridge wing, I'm mesmerised at my spot under the stars.

Officer Watch Owen Newton is taking time out, because his presence on the bridge is not required when the wind is below 20 knots, and he leaves the ship in the hands of two of the youngest crew, Scramble and his 19-year-old colleague from Durham.

We talk about the Tornados and the Typhoons, and some of the many "open secrets" of the military.

I learn also that Argentine planes made a nuisance of themselves, flying within five miles of Falklands airspace as soon as the Typhoons arrived, but the British pilots also enjoyed a little sabre-rattling so soon after their southern deployment.

"It's good to have you people on board," says Scramble, "because it means you can see we're just human after all."

One guest in particular is welcomed by the boys, and it's not so surprising their morale skyrocketed every time they see the svelte figure of temporary ship's photographer Georgina Strange walk by in her skin-tight jeans and boots.

"Every time she walks past the DAS we take a look," says Durham boy.

DAS is the infra-red camera mounted at strategic positions around the ship, controlled remotely from the bridge. "We use it to keep an eye on specific targets," an officer tells me later. If only Georgina knew.

THURSDAY

The ship's pipes sound at 7am, and the day begins fine and fresh but, because the Ocean Nova cruise ship has dropped anchor at Gold Harbour, and discretion being the better part of valour, all guest flights in the Lynx are cancelled.

The reason is to allow the cruise passengers to enjoy as unspoilt a time as possible as they are ferried ashore to walk among the wildlife. Iain keeps all audible comms to a minimum in order to maintain a discreet presence, a courtesy the Gloucester makes for all cruise ship passengers.

Later in the day I'm called to the quarterdeck, to join one of the groups of eight guests and crew to be shipped over to the beach in the MIB. Zipping and fastening the one-piece wetsuit and clambering down the steps into the boat is the most unpleasant part of

the afternoon. That is, until we have to wait half an hour on the beach, shivering, before we are picked up for our return.

In between, though, is one of the most spectacular sights I have ever seen: thousands upon thousands of king penguins, hundreds of chicks, a couple of thousand seals – from elephants to furs and their pups – and a handful of albatross, giant petrels and skuas. Dawdling among them are even a few gannets, seemingly oblivious to the cacophony around them.

And, apart from this remarkable sight, it is the sound that imprints itself upon the senses.

The penguins squawk and screech, keeping an eye out for their chicks and warning off their airborne predators.

The fur seals are growling fiercely, especially when they're threatened. But most impressive of all are the elephant seals, jealously protecting their harems.

With an almighty guttural roar, they are not in the mood to entertain guests of any description. When approached by a rival, the giant slug-like mammals arch their spines and raise their necks in a demonstration of machismo designed to impress their mates and flatter their lady friends.

Meanwhile, the black furry pups are weaning and suckling, the king chicks are feeding beak-to-beak on regurgitated food from their parents, and all the while the predatory birds are swooping overhead.

There appears to be safety in numbers, but that's not quite the case. Among the colonies, all of which are huddled together, standing on the damp, snow-flecked black sand, lie the remains of a few infant carcasses, invariably with their eye sockets empty.

As I meander among the tussock mounds, I keep an eye out for fur seals taking a nap. But most are quite unperturbed by my presence.

The cruise liner tourists have departed, and there are no more than a couple of dozen of us spread out over half a mile of beach.

The only other sign of civilisation is the Golden Fleece, Jerome Poncet's yacht, which has sailed down from Beaver Island on a charter.

It bobs incongruously 100 metres off the shore, while the Gloucester broods in the background, on the edge of the half-mile limit which the warship must observe in lieu of the breeding colonies onshore.

The colours before us are intriguing, too. The gold-collared kings, with their slinky white breasts and black overcoats, are the brightest



of the beach's residents. Their chicks are chocolate brown, while the seals deploy grey scale in abundance.

The tussac is a mix of dull and bright green, set off by the snow which slips down the slopes towards the darkened beach, pitted with mounds that appear to be albatross nests from seasons past. The silvery stream weaves its way through as it drip-feeds the ocean and, at an elevated spot close to our landing point, a craggy rockface is dissected by a mini waterfall, flanked by rows of icicles.

Throwing together a hatful of superlatives would not do justice to this scene, despite the chill air being swept by snowflakes. It's just a moment to behold, and to be grateful to witness. Even Paul, who this morning flew for 90 minutes over mountain caps, glaciers and fjords, says it's incredible.

I criss-cross between the kings and the seals, wade through the stream, skirt around the beach edge, and clamber up the snowdrift to the icicles. It's only when my hands begin to feel numb that I figure I should think about rejoining the ship.

By the end of the afternoon, two hours after slipping into our rubber suits, eight of us are standing on the beach among the elephant seal harems, while their pups frolic beside us.

We pull the boat ashore, clamber onto its inflated tubular wings, and hold onto the ropes along the flanks as we bobble back to base.

It's only when I disrobe on the quarterdeck that I realise my camera has fallen into my drysuit, sloshing about with my boots during the boat trip back. I discover later it is ruined but, remarkably, the memory card has survived.

A handful of guests gather in the wardroom after dinner, but many retire as early as 8pm. It's been that kind of day.

By the time I put my head down, we're on our way to Leith Harbour where, on March 19 1982, a crack team of 15 divers from Argentine special forces, posing as scrap metal merchants, occupied the abandoned whaling station.

It was the act which was to lead to the Falklands War.

FRIDAY

A handful of hardy souls want to add the final leg of Shackleton's famous walk to their CV of adventures and, after dispatching them shoreside at Leith, my focus turns skywards.

I'm called to the flight deck once more, and this time the Lynx is cleared for take-off.

Paul and Joe sweep us up and away along the coast to the north and then, for the most spectacular segment of our excursion, across the coastal range at 3,000 feet and back down over the Gold Rover, also moored here today, towards the Gloucester.

We're on the sunny side up, and it's as if the pure, clear air is almost drinkable. We plough through a little misty turbulence above some of the peaks, and land with a gentle plop on

the flight deck. We've been in the air only 12 minutes, but some of the sights I've seen, especially the ships at anchor mimicking the grey plastic toys I used to play with as a child, will remain for much longer. Had we been required to pay for our joyflight, it would have cost us £650 each.

I devote the remainder of my day to my interviews. This is the pointy end of the patrol for me because, with just three full days remaining before our ETA at MPA, it is now I can reap most reward from the day-to-day relationships I have built up with the crew.

And I have realised, too, how relationships between the crew themselves are pivotal to the Gloucester's operations, and its reputation.

Darbs, who knows what it's like to share a mess with 60 shipmates, has grown to become something of a father figure to his younger charges: "You have to trust one another," he says. "That's one of the greatest things we have to instill in the junior ratings.

"You've got young lads joining who are 16 years old, and you try to put the guys at ease and make them feel at home. A lot of them are missing their parents, their girlfriends, and it's a big shock for them. They've got to start thinking for themselves, and at times they have a lot of responsibility.

"I know my guys' Christian names. I have a list of when their birthdays are, where the wives and girlfriends are, whether they've got kids. When you walk past and you say 'oh, hi so-and-so, how are you doing? It's four days to your birthday,' or 'it's your daughter's birthday tomorrow,' the look of surprise on their faces is actually quite nice.

"The blocks that are there soon start falling, and then they trust you. It doesn't matter that I'm an officer and the young lad on the bridge is an able seaman. There will come a time in my career when I may need to trust them, and when they need to trust me."

There are more than the usual number in the wardroom after dinner, and I spend a couple of hours propping up the bar with assorted officers and guests.

And it's one of the best social evenings of all: the flatscreen is blank, those of us normally perched on the corner seats with our laptops are taking the evening off from writing, uploading and burning, and there is a real sense of mateship hovering around.

And, as usual, Joe is close to hand: "The ship is full of characters," he says. "You will always get people who are moaning - Jack is not happy unless he's moaning - but generally there is a really good feel about this ship.

"You get to know people because you're working so closely with them, and once you get to know people and you're comfortable in their surroundings, then you can loosen up a little bit. The lads will be a little cheeky from time to time, but there's always that level of respect there, at the end of the day.

"The Gloucester has got a good feel about it," says Joe. "It's full of good people and, because everybody gels together quite nicely, I think that's where it all comes from."

"And, of course, the ship is well led, and it all cascades from the top downwards."

SATURDAY

Most of the guests take advantage of the best weather of the trip, hopping into the MIBs as we are moored off Stromness. But I stay on board.

I have three days of interviews lined up, and I'm about to learn so much more about the characters who put the heart and soul into this remarkable vessel.

Each paints a fascinating picture of life at sea, and each paints it from a different perspective.

Scouse chef Paul Grethe joined up 21 years ago and leads a team of 12 working on four watches to produce 250 meals three times a day – and everyone is served the same food, from the Captain to the youngest in the ranks.

"The only difference is that the officers in the wardroom get a starter with their evening meal," says Paul in his thick Liverpool brogue. "And it has to be universally good. If the chef has a bad day, everybody knows about it. So that's why we always make it a good day."

With enough food on board to last up to 75 days, creating a consistently healthy menu is a priority. It's also something of a culinary challenge, given he has to feed every member of the ship's company for the princely sum of £2.31 per day.

"Obviously on a trip like this we've been out for a long time, so we'll be on the fresh and then onto the frozen before we get onto the tins. But we won't just chuck out rubbish willy-nilly. It's got to be a good mix."

And that's easier said than done in an environment with an ambient temperature of more than 50 degrees centigrade.

His workspace is not much bigger than that which you would find in a decent restaurant.

There are enormous heavy duty boiling coppers for stews and broths, a giant bratt pan, deep fat fryers, combination ovens that can steam as well as roast (and probably perform somersaults, if asked), and the grill is not the sort of place you'd want to put anything you didn't intend for a thorough grilling.

Every appliance is supersized and supercharged. Yet, remarkably, there are just five halogen hotplates on the hob.

But good humour rules the roost: "All the chefs in the navy work hard. There's no ifs or buts about it. And the food on the Gloucester is the best in the fleet, obviously – I'm here! Jamie Oliver and Gordon Ramsay are just part-

timers. I'd like to see them in a force ten trying to cook scram for 250 people. Ha!"

Midshipman Pete Cowan is the most junior officer on the Gloucester – and he's reminded of that every day in the wardroom.

But, as the entire ship's company seems to agree, the banter and the ribbing goes with the territory: "That's how you learn how to live on board a ship," he says. "You can have an absolutely miserable time if you don't know the naval way of living, having a laugh, the things we joke about."

"It's a very boisterous wardroom, and you have a lot of people taking the mickey out of each other. That's just the way it is."

"But if you don't get into the way of it, then you won't pick up on the humour and it won't be as much fun for you."

It helps, too, that the Gloucester boasts an excellent reputation within the fleet: "As soon as I found out I was going on the Gloucester, everybody I spoke to said it was a great ship," says Pete.

"It's a strange thing, because it's not just the Captain who changes, everybody changes over the years. I think it's more the ethos of the ship that lives on."

"Every single person who joins the ship brings a little bit to it, and everyone who leaves takes a little bit with them."

We weigh anchor as the sun sets and start our trek home back up the northern edge of South Georgia. Within a couple of hours we're in the open sea, and the seals that were leaping out of the water alongside us, trying to keep up, are long gone.

SUNDAY

Gordon Irvine and Adam Drozdowski are among today's interviewees as I spend the last full day in my office at sea.

And if any member of the ship's company needs healing – spiritually or physically – then there is only one place to go: the two-man cabin which the Doc shares with the Bish.

Aberdeen-born Gordon enjoys a similar level of autonomy as his roommate and, of course, observes a similar level of confidentiality with those he works.

The hippocratic oath still applies, so he is not obliged to relay patients' details to his superiors, but the Captain will be informed if an illness or injury is likely to affect ship's operations.

"He doesn't necessarily get told all the nitty gritty," says Gordon. "But if it's going to adversely affect the operational capability of the ship, or if it's going to affect our programme – for instance, if we need to muster the helicopter to get the casualty evacuated – then we need to let him know."



Ellen Shephard

ONE month shy of her 17th birthday, Ellen Shephard said goodbye to Norfolk and signed up for the navy. A little more than ten years later, and already a veteran of tours to Afghanistan and Iraq, on this deployment she finds herself in a rather unique position, as the only female among the ship's company.

Now a lieutenant, she first visited the Falklands for a six week recce ahead of the 25th anniversary of Liberation.

"We were lucky that we came down in the January to help the journalists get their footage while the weather was good, and do the flights around some of the neighbouring islands. Then I came back for the anniversary in June. It was quite moving. The population of Stanley was so welcoming and accommodating."

"I remember my mum saying I think you might have left a little piece of your heart in the Falklands, because when I came back home I was just full of it. It's such a wholesome way of life and the people on the Islands are all looking out for one another."

"It's how I imagined the UK to have been when I was little," she says. "To be there and to listen to the stories of the veterans, it just made it so amazing. Their achievement to retain the Islands was just fantastic. It really was quite humbling to hear their stories."

As Deputy Logistics Officer, Ellen's primary role is administrative. Like her colleagues, she enjoys winding down in the wardroom – and being the only girl on board can have its advantages.

"I joke with the lads and maybe I get away with a little bit more, with the cheekiness. But I find they tend to look out for me probably a little bit more too. That's always been the nature of things."

With a boyfriend also in the navy, Ellen is only too well aware that their time together, however fleeting, is incredibly precious: "Leave periods are very important, and any time you get to spend with each other is a godsend."

As, of course, are the home comforts: "I miss wearing girly clothes. I know it sounds like a cliché, but I guess any girl will tell you that if they have to walk around in uniform all day."

"And I miss having my hair done, and shopping for food so I can cook. I love having friends over for dinner, and I miss just having girly chats. I don't tend to talk quite as freely with the lads as I do with my girlfriends."

"But we gel a lot because we are all in the same situation. We try to make life as easy for one another as we can."

MIKE Logan was 23 when he followed in his father's footsteps and joined the navy. And he has big boots to step into – his father was a veteran of the Falklands War.

"His name is Guy Logan, and he was chief petty steward. His nickname was Frenchy, and in 1982 he was serving on the Bristol, the main communications ship, a type 82 destroyer which served alongside the carriers," says Mike.

"He was a leading hand, and the Bristol was around the same area where the Sheffield was sunk. He said it was pretty loud, he could hear a lot of bombs going off and missiles going over the ship. It was a very terrible time.

"He kept hearing warnings about different ships being lost in that area. But the Bristol suffered no damage. She was one of the lucky ones.

"I've always wanted to see where my dad's been and where he's fought. And in the Falklands I've met some of the locals and learned about the history. There's one chap in the Globe I met called Don Bonner. He's an ex-matelot himself. He's got a lot of good stories."

This is Mike's first deployment, and he's close to completing his training in communications: "There's no better job in the world," he says. "And you're there for your country. It's an honour."

But life at sea is a particularly loud and bumpy one for Mike – his mess deck is the most for'ard of the lot.

"We're the guys who bounce up and down in our beds when it gets rough," he says. "We get thrown out of our racks all the time. Sea state nine is the worst. You actually lift off your bunk a couple of inches, and you're in mid air for what seems like ten seconds. You can't sleep.

"And we're right beneath the main gun, so when that's firing we don't get any sleep either. But mess life is really good. We get out the X-Box or the games console, and we have DVDs and darts. It's a pretty good environment and we have some good laughs.

"But your rack is the only place of your own when you're at sea, so to be at home, to relax with a bit of peace and quiet, is fantastic.

"When I get back home the first thing I'll do will be to meet my pals and go to the pub. And every Friday afternoon have a few games of pool with my dad. That's what I miss, a bit of quality time with my dad. And seeing Portsmouth play."

In the meantime, he's looking forward to visiting the Falklands again: "I'll catch up with Don, and hopefully I'll have a few stories of my own to tell him next time."

A majority of ailments are relatively minor, and a majority of injuries are muscular skeletal: "People are working in fairly confined spaces and we're moving all the time. The ship is swaying from side to side and they're going up and down ladders in very close and confined quarters, so you get injuries just from that."

The potential for much worse is always in the background: "We haven't been into combat on this tour so far," says Gordon.

"We do practice on a regular basis and, prior to deployment, we get rigorously tested in Plymouth. We go through the whole procedures we would go through if we were going into action in a combat zone.

"They inject a number of casualties into the scene, and you treat them as you would do in real life."

Stanley's hospital also has forged strong links with the Gloucester and her sister ships over the years: "The staff at KEMH have been exceptionally good to us," says Gordon.

"We don't have the ability to use x-rays or ultrasounds and we don't have the ability to process blood results as they do, and they've been excellent every time we have sent somebody up there."

But there is one ailment which Gordon says affects everybody: "In actual fact you can put a figure on the amount of people on board who are seasick," he says. "It's 100 per cent, at some point.

"It's usually fairly short-lived, and it's usually within the first couple of days of sailing, or when you hit a particularly rough patch of sea. A lie down for half an hour is usually enough to get people settled."

When I ask if he believes the Captain's claim to have never suffered seasickness, he performs a hippocratic sidestep: "Not wishing to divulge any medical information, certainly he is particularly robust at the moment," he says. "But I'm sure in the past he's probably had occasions when he's felt slightly worse for wear."

Handing out nicknames is a Navy tradition, but for Adam "Scrabble" Drozdowski it's perhaps more of a necessity.

The AB from Bournemouth is one of the junior ratings often assigned to middle watch on the bridge, the midnight to 4am shift.

And, if the weather's kind, he will be poking the ship towards the horizon.

"For a person my age, steering a ship is like getting your first car," he says. "You're really nervous at first, and then you get used to it."

"You get a lot of laughs out of the night watch. You get to know your colleagues quite well. It's really odd, because the officer watch is your boss, but also like a friend as well. You've always got to have that level of respect for the

officers, and sometimes it's hard because you get used to hearing their nicknames. But if you call them by their nicknames they give you a bollocking, basically. So I always put sir on the end."

A rating for less than two years, Adam is the third generation of his family to enter the military.

His grandfather served with the Polish Armoured Regiment in Italy's Battle of Monte Cassino during World War Two, and his father spent 22 years in the British Army.

"He was a lance corporal in the Royal Logistics Corps installing those big tanks on the other side of Stanley.

"He'll talk about being sent to work down here but he won't talk about the conflict, because he's got a couple of friends who lost their lives down here."

Joining the navy has not only offered Adam a career and ambition ("AB is one of the lowest ranks. I'm paid about £16,000 a year so it's an incentive to work your way up") it also has earned him self-respect.

"I was one of these kids who couldn't be arsed to do anything with my life, hanging around the street corners with skateboards, and just causing mayhem, really," he admits.

"Ever since I've joined the forces me and my dad have got this special relationship."

And he'll still be feisty when it's called for: "Right now the navy is not a fighting force because we're here to help you.

"But if you screw around with us, we are going to defend ourselves, no matter what."

I wrap up my microphone and headset around 6pm, just after the Captain has ratcheted the ship up a gear or two. We need to take fuel from the Gold Rover tomorrow, and she's way ahead of us, so we speed up to 24

knots for a swell ride through the breakers, at least until late evening when the majority are in their bunks. We're due back at Mare Harbour in less than a day, and already I'm sad this adventure is slowly coming to an end.

I've slotted in well to the shipboard routine, and I haven't been bored for a single minute.

I enjoy being rocked to sleep in my bunk, even though clambering in and out of it can be a little challenging, and the food is excellent.

The only drawback is the cramped conditions in the cabin, such that the bag beneath my feet has never been properly emptied. It is, I am told, my floor-drobe.

But it is a small price to pay for such a privileged experience.

MONDAY

We make good progress overnight, and East Cove Military Port is now only a few hours away. But, before the voyage ends, there's the little matter of joining a firing display by the gunnery from the port wing.

I'm cocooned in a fire retardant hood and gloves, Kevlar body armour, ear plugs, ear protectors and a heavy helmet.

"The only reason we issue you with the Kevlar is to help the doctor," says the guy in the warfare room, kitting me out.

"If you get hit, the Kevlar will keep your body pieces together and the doctor won't have to go running around looking for the bits."

Boom goes the big 4.5-inch gun from the turret fore'sle. Kerpow goes the gumbo. Rat-at-tat goes the machine gun.

It's all very impressive, but I'm distracted by the fact that my skull is being slowly squeezed by my headgear, and I duck back down below after spending an hour feeling like an overdressed garage attendant with a splitting headache.

We pull up to the bumper of the Gold Rover around 1.30pm and draw alongside for the rather thrilling sight of a RAS: a Replenishment at Sea.

A 100-metre rubber snake slowly unfurls below the crane at midships on the Rover, and slithers across to the Gloucester, suspended by ropes and wires, until it docks its nozzled head into the coupling on our top deck.

It's an impressive performance, especially as the operation requires the transfer of almost 400 tonnes of fuel, more than half the Gloucester's capacity. And it's all over in less than three hours. Had we taken the same amount of fuel on board through a conventional bowser, it would have taken a day and a half and emptied 25 road tankers.

The twilight hours are occupied primarily by preparations to disembark, and more hopping up and down the steep ladders between decks, which have kept my calves in tip-top shape, if nothing else.

And, before I must disembark, I have one more important appointment to keep: with the Captain who invited me to join his patrol.

A simple love of the sea drew a young Iain Lower to the navy, and he grew up fast.

At just 23 he was second-in-command of a minesweeper and, at 36, Commander of the Leeds Castle, which brought him to the Falklands for the first time five years ago.

Now commanding the Gloucester, on his final tour before taking up a desk job with the MoD in London, he recognises not only the huge logistical responsibilities which accompany his role, but also the personal touches - the need to make sure everyone in the ship's company is melding as a team.

And he agrees his unannounced late night walkabouts are among the most satisfying moments with his crew.

"To me it's an opportunity to look them in the eye and just talk things through, talk about what's happening on the ship at the moment, and ask if everything's OK," he says.

"Sometimes people open up to you, and I do get feedback. But it's a difficult relationship as a CO. People are always on their guard, I suppose. But I don't do it for that reason.

"I do it because people are working in the middle of the night, and that's when people are at their loneliest. I don't do it every night, but I do it quite a bit."

The other links he has forged, of course, are with the Falklands and its people: "I think it's important on two counts," he says. "It's important for Falkland Islanders to understand what we're about; the fact that we are here as part of a deterrent.

"And it's important for us too, because of the sense of worth that our sailors get when they talk with the Islanders.

"They understand we are genuinely appreciated. I think both sides are getting an

awful lot out of building those links and, if anything were to happen, it's very important we know what we're fighting for.

"It's people like Don Bonner and others who sum up what the Falklands is all about. There is such a shared history between the Falklands and the Royal Navy.

"It's a naval community down here in many respects, so it's a natural place for us to operate in. We feel very at home here."

Soon, though, he will be handing over to his successor, David George, who will lead the Gloucester on her final deployment to the South Atlantic before she is decommissioned in 2011. And it won't be the easiest of transitions.

"Being in command of any size of ship is a very personal thing," says Iain.

"To be in command of a ship like the Gloucester, which is probably the most famous ship in the navy at the moment, there's an awful lot of emotional connection, and that isn't something which you can just hand over command and forget about.

"There is a period of readjustment. My poor wife will suffer no doubt.

"It's not the metal, it's the people, and it's leaving people wanting to continue their careers in the Royal Navy, wanting to be ambitious, to achieve what they want to achieve. It's leaving people enthusiastic and, in a sense, bright-eyed about the career they've chosen. That's what I've tried to do.

"But when I'm in the MoD next year there will be times when my mind will wander along the M4 to Gloucester, via Stanley, Cape Horn, Patagonia and South Georgia," he says.

"And it will be Gloucester's last deployment. But I'll keep an eye on her."

Our approach to Mare Harbour puts a twinkle in the eye of almost everyone on board. The crew is eager for a night or two of r'n'r on dry land, and the guests wave to friends waiting to greet them alongside.

When I queue up on deck with my bag slung over our shoulders, there is time for just a few swift goodbyes. I have been at sea for 11 days, lived among the crew of a Royal Navy warship arguably the best in the fleet and, thanks to their hospitality, I've set foot on South Georgia, one of the most spectacular wildernesses on earth.

It has been one of those experiences which truly does justify the "trip of a lifetime" cliché. But, having immersed myself so deeply in this exquisite adventure, I have failed to anticipate the abruptness with which it will end.

It's like the shock of awakening from an enjoyable dream.

In an instant... it's over.

My most grateful and sincere thanks to Commander Iain Lower, the crew of HMS Gloucester and the good people of Grytviken, South Georgia.



Santa hitches ride to Camp

LAST week Flying Santa gave his reindeer a day off and hopped onto the Sea King helicopter to deliver Christmas gifts to four Camp locations. Hill Cove was the first stop before he flew on to Fox Bay, North Arm and Goose Green. Elves enjoyed mince pies while Santa gave a keyboard rendition of Silent Night. North Arm children challenged Santa to a

game of Frisbee, and all children received a gift, fruit and stickers. The Flying Santa Appeal is very grateful to 78 Squadron, especially the helicopter crew whose invaluable assistance enabled Santa to deliver presents to more than 30 children. They would also like to thank those whose kind donations ensured all Camp children received a gift.

THE longest running police investigation in the history of the Falkland Islands entered a new phase recently with the arrival in the Islands of two members of staff from the Operational Technology Branch of the Metropolitan Police.

Royal Marine Alan Addis was last seen at North Arm on the evening of August 8 1980 and, despite intensive searches, his body has never been found.

The presence of the Scotland Yard officers, who are believed to have been equipped with ground-penetrating radar, was requested by the Royal Falkland Islands Police (RFIP) as a result of what the Director of Community Safety and Chief Police Officer (CPO) Gary Finchett described as "intelligence received."

Assisted by officers of the RFIP, the Scotland Yard officers carried out "comprehensive searches at specific premises at North Arm" as a result of which, CPO Finchett told the Penguin News, "new information and intelligence has been obtained and is being progressed."

CPO Finchett maintains: "The investigation into Marine Addis's disappearance is a search for the truth and the case will remain ongoing until we establish exactly what happened to Alan 30 years ago. Every time new information is received it is rigorously progressed."

"We now have several new lines of enquiry which we are actively pursuing."

Marine Addis was on a routine patrol with a training detachment aboard MV Forrest when it called into North Arm for a night at the Social Club. According to some reports, he was last sighted there at 1.30am, but it wasn't until some time after the Forrest had sailed at 7am that his absence was noted by his colleagues.

Since the disappearance of the 19-year-old marine there have been a number of police inquiries, beginning with a land, sea and air search, which was called off three days after his disappearance.

This search was followed in 1981 by an inquiry involving RFIP and the military Special Investigation Branch (SIB) and a further SIB enquiry in 1983.

In 1995, driven at least in part by a tireless campaign for information waged by Marine Addis's mother Ann, a group of six officers from the Devon and Cornwall Police arrived in the Falkland Islands with a specialist sniffer dog to carry out a further investigation.

This investigation led to the arrest on suspicion of murder of four Islanders, who were interviewed then later released on bail with no further action being taken. The dog, Lee, proved to be unsuitable for the conditions of the Falkland Islands and was adopted as a family pet by Bernie and Moira Eccles.

Throughout the long years since her son's disappearance, Mrs Addis has kept alive the hope that one day his whereabouts and what happened to him might be known.

Mrs Addis has visited the Islands twice, once in 1981 and once in 1995, when she took the unusual step of meeting the four men who had been arrested by the Devon and Cornwall Police.

Having written a book about her son's disappearance, now all Mrs Addis wants is to bring her son's remains home.

CPO Finchett appeals to anyone with information which might help Mrs Addis achieve this end and end her long search for truth, to call RFIP on 28100 or himself directly on 28107 or mobile 52483. He assures us that all calls will be treated in confidence.

PM's Christmas message for the Falkland Islands

I AM delighted to be sending my first Christmas message to the Falkland Islands.

The Falklands is one of our most important overseas communities and I very much hope that I will have the chance to visit during my time as Prime Minister.

I was delighted that one of my first visitors to Downing Street was Lady Thatcher who did so much to uphold your liberty.

I am sure you will have followed events back in Britain closely over the past year. The first Coalition government for 65 years has seen two parties – the Conservatives and the Liberal Democrats – put aside party difference to work together in the national interest. We have had to make some tough decisions – not least to get to grips with the biggest budget deficit since the Second World War and a £38 billion black hole in the future defence plans.

But as we look to the New Year, I hope we can do so with a growing sense of optimism that we are getting Britain's finances back on a sound footing.

Like everyone else, you will want to know what the decisions we have made will mean for you.

In particular, what they mean for your economy; and how your security will be affected. Let me briefly try to answer these questions.

The first thing to say is that we will continue to support efforts to diversify your economy.

This year has seen the start of the current round of hydrocarbons exploration in the waters around your Islands. It has been an exciting time.

The news has sometimes been encouraging, and yet also sometimes disappointing. While there is no guarantee of commercially viable finds, many of you must already be thinking about the impact that exploitation would have on your way of life.

I want to make sure that you control how any such change happens, and ensure that your community reaps the benefits from it.

Of course, hydrocarbons exploration has also meant that relationships in the region have been all the more difficult.

There have been attempts to disrupt shipping to the Islands; we have made it clear that we do not believe these attempts comply with international law.

It is in all our interests that we maintain a constructive working relationship with Argentina. And we will continue to do so.

At the G20 and on tackling climate change, there is common ground to be found. But let me reassure you, we will stand resolutely beside you on any question of sovereignty.

We have no doubts whatsoever about the United Kingdom's sovereignty over the Falkland Islands.

And there can and will be no negotiations on the sovereignty of the Islands unless you, the Falkland Islanders, want them.

As a result of the Strategic Defence and Security Review, there has been no change to the forces at the disposal of the Commander of the British Forces in the South Atlantic Islands.

He will have the right range of potent assets to defend the Islands – and reinforce quickly if necessary. So let me say clearly, the security of the Falkland Islands has been in no way diminished.

The UK's commitment to your Islands is without question. Our interest in your prosperity, our determination to ensure your security and our resolve to stand beside you on any question of sovereignty remain as strong as ever.

I wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a prosperous and successful 2011.

Cape Pembroke under the spotlight for action

PERHAPS prompted by comment in a recent Penguin News editorial, the attention of the Environmental Committee turned to Cape Pembroke during its final meeting of the year.

Chair of the Committee, Cllr Emma Edwards, said that while recently flying over Cape Pembroke she had been appalled at the extent of damage which appeared to have been done there by vehicles, including motorbikes.

Head of the Environmental Planning Department, Antony Payne, told the committee he was preparing a briefing paper on possible management strategies for the Cape, with the hope of balancing the right of access to it as a part of

Stanley Common with its status as a designated area. There were now four times as many 4x4 vehicles in the Falklands than there were in 1986, said Mr Payne, and the Road Traffic Ordinance currently gave their owners the right to drive on Stanley Common. However, it was clear there was no appetite for further legislation among members of the Legislative Assembly such as might enable Cape Pembroke to be dealt with separately under law.

There were already signs in place advising people using the area on correct behaviour, but these were difficult to read and it was planned that these should be replaced by signs which were more readable from moving vehicles.

Councillor Edwards said there was need for more publicity about the importance of Cape Pembroke, especially in terms of its flora.

Rebecca Upson of Falklands Conservation and other volunteers were currently engaged in replanting projects, and the all-weather track to the lighthouse should be completed in order to avoid the necessity for off-road driving.

Finally, it was hoped that a meeting could be convened of all parties interested in using the Cape for recreational purposes or for conservation including, if possible, the young people currently being blamed for its degradation.

It is important that they have a voice," said Cllr Edwards.

Smoking ban looms in February

AFTER ten years of debate, the ban on smoking in public places is now earmarked to become law on February 1. Councillors who last month supported the ban by a majority had originally hoped to see it enforced on January 1. However, legislation cannot be enabled before February because of the need for police and court departments to be appropriately trained.

At a meeting of Executive Council last Thursday, councillors also

agreed that the target date for a referendum on a possible single constituency would be November next year.

In other ExCo announcements, parking restrictions on St Mary's Walk near the hospital were agreed in principle, and would be implemented as soon as the necessary regulations could be approved.

A proposal relating to the installation of autopilots in Islander aircraft to meet new mandatory

ASSI requirements also was considered, and a review of the aircraft fleet will be undertaken to produce recommendations for phased refurbishment and/or replacement of aircraft.

A much simplified single page questionnaire to confirm the right of status holders to stamps in their passports also was approved at ExCo. This was devised in response to complaints that the previous form was excessively complex.

Rockhopper to take up two slots

ROCKHOPPER Exploration this week announced it was to take up two optional drilling slots on the Ocean Guardian rig ahead of drilling an exploration well in the New Year.

Rockhopper intends to target deeper sands about 8km from the Sea Lion find, the only site in the North Falklands Basin so far to be declared an oil discovery.

The company is also in further discussions with the Falkland Islands Government about formally declaring the area around Sea Lion an official discovery area.

Sam Moody, Chief Executive of Rockhopper, said: "We expect to undertake a significant drilling programme during 2011, including a number of appraisal and exploration wells designed to refine our understanding of our northern licences."

On Saturday Desire Petroleum announced also it had spudded the Dawn/Jacinta 25/5-1 well. The total depth of the well is planned to be 1,670 metres and is expected to take 30 days to complete.

Trade protest

THE Mercosur summit last week approved a declaration protesting "formally and energetically" the UK's decision to hold military exercises in the Falklands. The South American trading bloc also reiterated its commitment to inform the Argentine Government of all vessels sailing to the Falklands with cargo in support of "illegal hydrocarbons or mineral activities on the Argentine continental shelf."

Talks continue

The Chamber of Commerce also is keeping a close watching brief on the issue, although no party is prepared to commit at this stage, other than to say talks are continuing.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

EACH of the two distinguished journalists, John Ezard and Brian Hanrahan, who died in the past two weeks, earned some of their many accolades for their reporting of the Falklands War and its aftermath. Brian Hanrahan used simple language to great effect. John Ezard's perceptive and stylish work was always a pleasure to read and often picked up on nuances missed by his more superficial colleagues. He'll be missed by the many friends he made in the Islands.

ON a lighter note, I wonder if we should make the question of whether an applicant believes that an Islander should be able to do the job of Chief Executive compulsory in applications for Falklands status. "Antediluvian attitudes" apart, I think the whole tone and purpose of public meetings have changed to allow genuine and friendly discussions. Sometimes they cover predictable ground but, more often than not, Assembly members learn something from questions from the public that might not otherwise have reached them.

RETURNING to antediluvian attitudes, my Assembly colleagues are probably bored by my reiteration of the need to be aware of several very different audiences every time we speak. Public meetings, for example, are one of the ways to maintain contact with those constituents who like an opportunity to question us in public. However, the moment a meeting is reported and broadcast, it goes out to wider audiences. These include Falklands watchers in Argentina and the many who pick up the Penguin News and other media in numerous countries. While I actively support anyone's right to hold and voice controversial opinions, I wonder if we really want some being read as indicative of the views of Falkland Islanders. As a Kelper, not the pejorative term some would believe but a term of pride, I sometimes cringe to see narrow and insular opinions attributed to us that are actually those of individuals who have yet to learn what it means to love our rugged and beautiful country.

Unfair dismissal appeal

A CIVIL court case in which Kenneth Stewart is claiming unfair dismissal against Falkland Islands Government was on Friday adjourned until February 4.

Mr Stewart has lodged his complaint under the employment protection ordinance, and also lodged an appeal with the Governor.

Principal Crown Counsel Ros Cheek said while the appeal to the Governor was being considered it

would be inadvisable to proceed without knowing its outcome.

She said she believed this was the first case of unfair dismissal brought against FIG under the ordinance, and an appropriate procedure for how to manage it would be considered when the matter returns to court.

In a separate case before the Senior Magistrate's Court on Tuesday, Kristy Wallace (28) of

MPA, admitted driving while under the influence of alcohol. A member of the public alerted the Royal Falkland Islands Police to a Land Rover being driven erratically.

Police stopped the vehicle after it drove the wrong way down Pencil Lane in Stanley.

Ms Wallace was disqualified from driving in the Falklands for 18 months and ordered to pay a total of £585 in fines and costs.

Prices and schedules would be determined by the parties involved, but she could not be any more specific at this stage.

Deputies step up to the mark as inspector visits

FOR the Education Department, facing up to its school inspection this year was rather like both teams trotting out onto the Wembley turf for the FA Cup final without a manager.

A replacement for Nick Barrett, who left the Infant and Junior School (IJS) as head teacher in August, has still to be found, and Mrs Helen Bell, the Deputy Head at the Community School (FICS) had to quickly step up to the mark when the school's previous head Alastair Baldwin resigned just a week before the arrival of Christopher Spence, Chief Inspector for Service Children's Education, who was to conduct the inspection.

With all this going on, it is no wonder that Acting Director of Education Richard Fogerty should have been heard on the radio recently emphasising what positives he could find in Mr Spence's report, which was based on school visits and discussions with staff, pupils and parents over a period of four days.

Emphasising the positive was probably easier in the case of the IJS and Camp Education, which were judged to be "satisfactory," although the report indicated that while the achievement for pupils at the end of their primary education had been "about average" for the past three years, in 2010 standards were "below in English" and "well below in Mathematics."

In terms of its "overall effectiveness" the IJS was judged to be "satisfactory and improving," which sounds quite good, until one learns that the Ofsted evaluation

schedule used for the inspection gives only four inspection grades: Grade 1: Outstanding, Grade 2: Good, Grade 3: Satisfactory and Grade 4: Inadequate.

The lowest grade of "inadequate" was the inspector's verdict on the Community School, despite reporting that "the school has made significant improvements since its last inspection in 2007. Standards have risen and the quality of teaching and learning has improved."

The FICS Deputy Head and senior staff also came in for praise for having "worked tirelessly to improve the school for the benefit of all learners."

In the end, the blame for the school's failure to measure up to expectations is laid firmly at the door of the departed headmaster, primarily because he had "clearly failed to share his vision of school improvement and win the hearts and minds of the vast majority of his staff."

While teachers at the school are prevented by the terms of their contracts from commenting to the

press, the statement in the report that "many teachers are disillusioned and dispirited and have expressed a measure of unhappiness to the inspector" comes as no surprise.

Nor does the report that "a large majority of staff have stated that they have no confidence in the head teacher."

If there is a surprise in any of this it is perhaps that it took an external inspection before this unhappiness and lack of confidence came to the notice of the higher echelons of the Education Department.

In response to the criticism of the school's leadership in the report, a statement from the Education Department says: "Steps are being taken to recruit a head teacher who can build on the very positive achievements that are in place."

"In the meantime the school will be ably led by Mrs Helen Bell, the deputy head teacher, who is working with the staff to minimise disruptions and ensure that our students continue to receive the best education the Islands can provide."

Speaking on local radio this week, Councillor Jan Cheek, who holds the Education Portfolio, said: "Arising out of the report, there will be an action plan for each school, addressing the areas where the inspector feels there is room for improvement, and no doubt there are a good number of those."

"It will be the job of the schools to implement those action plans. I hope we can build on the good progress shown so far."



Death of veteran reporter

BRIAN Hanrahan, the long-serving BBC foreign correspondent best known for his coverage of the Falklands war, has died after a short illness.

Hanrahan, 61, the former BBC world diplomatic editor, also witnessed first hand the 1989 Tiananmen Square protests in China and the fall of the Berlin Wall. However, he will be best remembered for the line: "I counted them all out and I counted them all back," from one of his reports from the South Atlantic during the Falklands War.

Hanrahan was referring to Harrier jump jets returning to one of the Royal Navy's carriers after completing a combat mission without loss. He used that form of words to get around military censorship of media reports – and it became the title of his book about the conflict, co-written with fellow correspondent Robert Fox.

Hanrahan died after a short battle with cancer. His BBC career spanned nearly 40 years, beginning in 1971 after graduating from Essex University.

He was on the aircraft carrier HMS Hermes during the Falklands War when the first air strikes on Stanley began in May 1982. Naval officials placed severe restrictions on what he could report, particularly in respect of the numbers of sorties flown by the Harrier jets.

Fox told the BBC today that in order to get around the restrictions, Hanrahan colluded with the "raffish Old Etonian intelligence officer" Rupert Nichol, who told him that they had both seen the same number of planes going in and coming back, and "that was the way he should go". Hanrahan turned the idea into the line he used on his broadcast.

BBC world news editor, Jon Williams, said Hanrahan "would always be remembered for an extraordinary story and an extraordinary turn of phrase."

Williams added that it was his "longevity" and his "tone" that marked him out. "He could always be relied on to find the right word at the right moment."

Delighted to share this wonderful Islands life

THE wind has veered North-Westerly, and there are white horses in the harbour. The light changes by the minute on the hills and rocks across the water, as sunshine gives way to cloud which, as I look up from the keyboard, looks like turning to rain. I can't think that I've lived anywhere in the world with a better view than that from Government House.

I'm not sure that the editor had the actual view in mind when he invited me to write a few words. But there's a natural tendency for your outlook to be influenced by your physical environment, and it's easier to be upbeat and positive when looking at a beautiful landscape rather than, say, the backs of tenement blocks.

Lou and I are naturally upbeat and positive. We've enjoyed all our postings in the Diplomatic Service. But even for us there was something special about standing on the bridge of HMS Clyde as she came through the Narrows, and seeing Stanley's waterfront opening out ahead of us.

Then, as we moored off Victory Green, her Captain, Adrian Fryer, pointed into the distance and said, "that's your new house"

Government House is a wonderful place to live. It's rambling, appears to have been shaped more by accident than design, but feels warm and friendly.

Successive Governors have left their mark, sometimes, in the case of names carved under the billiard table, literally. But the overall effect is of a well-loved, well-used and welcoming home.

We know we're lucky to live here, and we know that we are only temporary custodians. That is why we plan to do as our predecessors have done, and give dinners and receptions to ensure as many people as possible have the chance to share it.

There can be no recurrence of the situation recorded in a Times article from 1976: "The house, where the colourful array of potted plants in the conservatory is changed daily, is bolted and barred to an unusual degree."

It is important to us to meet as many people as possible, and to listen to what they have to say about their lives and their hopes for the future.

However you view the role of Governor, one thing that is essential is communication, in both directions. So I want to take whatever steps I can to de-

mystify the job, and what goes on in Government House. I'm on record as saying I view time spent behind a desk as time wasted: the Argentine press were kind enough to emphasise that point when they reported my swearing in.

The 1976 Times article described the Governor as "a lonely man, rarely seen outside Government House." I don't want that said of me.

You learn a lot by wandering about, dropping in on people unexpectedly. It enables them to tell you things they wouldn't normally think worth mentioning, which often turn out to be important. My favourite place is

the Chief Magistrate's and Registrar's Office, where, when you ring the bell, someone opens a little hatch to peer at you. This can be entertaining: I can still see the look on John Trevaskis's face at the hatch when I first called on him unannounced.

It would be quite easy for the Governor just to have the necessary formal meetings, and to centre his life on ExCo. But the Governor is the only person who has, or at least should have, an overview of what goes on in the Islands.

He needs to build up the trust of, and an easy working relationship with, a wide range of people: MLAs, obviously; the Attorney General; CBFSAI; the Chief Executive and FIG; members of the Chamber of Commerce and other businesses. The list could go on. These are the people who actually make things happen.

I see the Governor as having an enabling role. He can spot problems, make connections, and get advice more widely from the HMG, the diplomatic network, and UK and international institutions. Of course he has to ensure the Constitution is complied with. But the focus of the job should be helping the

elected representatives achieve their vision for the future of the Islands, rather than telling them what they can't do.

The next three years – the duration of the present Legislative Assembly, and the length of my appointment – will be critical for the future of the Falkland Islands. By then, it will be clear whether an oil industry is commercially viable, and if it is, decisions will have to be taken about how it should be socially and economically integrated into Island life.

For a long time the Islands' prosperity has been based on the fishing industry, which, as Stuart Wallace noted at the FIFCA dinner, is well-managed, responsible, and has an excellent reputation.

But even so, as Stuart pointed out, it has already suffered one "truly avoidable environmental tragedy," the collapse of the Southern Blue Whiting stock, through the actions of others.

The challenge is to ensure the economy not only expands, but diversifies so that it does not rely entirely on one or two volatile industries.

The Economic Development Strategy is key, and it will be important to translate political will into a concrete, properly-funded implementation strategy.

This country has a great future: but we must work together to make it happen.

I love it here. I've wanted to come here for a long time. On my twenty-first birthday, I stood on the cliffs at Porthleven with my Uncle James, leaning into a howling gale. A former Merchant Seaman, he said to me: "You know you always wanted to go to the Falklands? This is what they're like on a calm day."

I remembered this as I stood up to my waist in the Murrell fishing the other week, with the wind driving the rain into my left ear. I said to myself: "This is brilliant! People would pay a fortune to fish in countryside like this. And I live here!"

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Three Course Dinner

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Fishing industry determined to ride challenging waves ahead

TENSIONS may have run high at times, in particular through its consultations over the Economic Development Strategy, but the Falklands fishing industry says it has achieved a good working relationship with government, as both brace themselves for challenging times ahead.

Stuart Wallace, last week re-elected as chairman of the Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association, said members had worked hard on a number of issues.

"The past twelve months have seen major collaborations with our government," he said.

"The EDS process consumed a great deal of time – on occasions tensions ran high – but in the end the industry arrived at a position all could share, and which was incorporated into the final EDS document."

He said also while the fee review study was taking longer than anticipated, and a final report would not now be available until the New Year, he was grateful for the effort put in by FIFCA members on the working group.

Mr Wallace told members and guests – including the governor and MLAs – at last Wednesday's FIFCA dinner: "The Association has met with Members of the Legislative Assembly and discussed matters such as the level of scientific support and observer coverage in the fishery, and we have very much welcomed the open invitation from MLAs to discuss with them issues in the future.

"Our fishery is globally recognised, the Falkland Islands fishing industry supports the responsible management of the fishery and is committed to acting responsibly.

"Our management system is based on sound scientific research, and with its property rights base of individually transferable quota

underpins the management and commercial development of the fishery."

While accusing Argentina of continued economic and environmental attack in its refusal to engage constructively in the management of marine resources – a situation which had already resulted in the collapse of the southern blue whiting stock, and which he described as "impossible to understand in the times we live in" – Mr Wallace was nevertheless encouraged by the confidence shown in the industry by its members.

"The fishing industry in the Falklands is a tough, complex and highly risky environment without the added risks introduced by the irresponsibility of our neighbours," he said.

"It is therefore extremely encouraging that we have welcomed new significant quota owners as members, and have seen major transfers of quota during the year. Good on all concerned for being prepared to risk their money, to say nothing of committing their time, in the development of the Falklands."

But one other key domestic issue continues to challenge, and to frustrate: the provision of adequate infrastructure to match the growing aspirations of the industry. Mr Wallace said he did not envy MLAs the responsibility of deciding on future port facilities, but he made clear his views on the increasing workload now being accommodated at FIPASS.

"Companies are already consigning product to an increasing number of destinations, shipments are being sorted on the dock, inspections carried out, complex export and health documen-

tation is being prepared, vessels are being laid up, maintenance and repair work undertaken, valuable skills are being learned. FIPASS is a busy place.

"Is it adequate for the medium term even? My reply is that if anyone thinks that it is, then they must explain where and how they think we are going to develop in the Falklands."

But in his closing remarks, he returned to his upbeat theme: "Our government is considering how best to meet the growing infrastructure needs, is open to discussion and not least we have government officers with whom we work on a daily basis who provide professional, friendly and helpful support to us all," he said. "The future can't be bad."

Working alongside Mr Wallace to help ensure the future of fishing in the Falklands meets its potential will be his newly elected fellow directors of FIFCA: Vice Chairman Tom Blake, (RBC Ltd), Mike Summers (Pioneer Seafoods Ltd), Drew Irvine (Argos Ltd) and Lewis Clifton (Byron Holdings Ltd).

Bold fusion of art and cartography

THE Falklands are provocatively portrayed in Spanish artist Fernando Vicente's latest work.

The architect of his travelling Bodyworld exhibit of plasticised human dissections, his new project sees him taking images of the globe from the atlas and superimposing continents, islands and waters with explicitly suggestive themes.

The piece titled "Elephantine Argentina," overlaid onto a map of South America, creates a trunk along the Andes, with the province of Buenos Aires bulging eastward into the elephant's cheek.


Liberty is taken by having the stumpy Misiones province fan out into the elephant's ear, and Argentina's claim over the

Falklands is represented by bold lines outlining an elephant trumpeting wildly over the South Atlantic in our direction.

At first glance the elephant looks the heavily structured work of a child, and is suggestive of an indignant nation throwing a bellowing tantrum.

Vicente's other works include a map of Africa which morphs into the portrait of a black woman by using the Horn of Africa as the base of her forehead and the roundness of West Africa as the back of her head.

However, Great Britain and Ireland are less attractively disguised as a couple of dead rabbits.



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Q What is a National Nature Reserve?

Answers to this and the following question were put together by the Environmental Planning Department and the Attorney General's Chambers

A CERTAIN areas have been legally declared National Nature Reserves (NNRs) by the Falkland Island Government (FIG) under the Conservation of Wildlife and Nature Ordinance (1999) in recognition of their importance for wildlife and plant species.

Prior to this legislation coming into force, sites were protected as wild animal and bird sanctuaries and nature reserves under the Wild Animals and Birds Protection Ordinance (1964) and the Nature Reserves Ordinance (1964).

It should be noted that not all land in the Falkland Islands that merits NNR status has so far been afforded this level of recognition and protection.

There are also many privately owned islands and mainland sites which are managed as private nature sanctuaries but which are not formally protected through legislation.

Q How many National Nature Reserves are there in the Falkland Islands? What are the rules for governing them, and who is responsible for ensuring the rules are enforced?

A THERE are currently 18 designated NNRs in the Falkland Islands. Eight of these sites are owned by FIG and ten are privately owned.

Seven NNRs are mainland East and West Falklands sites. The remaining eleven NNRs comprise various island groups and collectively cover 27 separate islands of varying sizes.

Notable FIG-owned NNRs include Beauchene Island, Bird Island, Kidney Island, the easterly Jason Islands group and Stanley Common which includes Cape Pembroke. The number can be expected to increase as new areas are formally protected (Sea Lion Island is likely to be next).

NNR's may be designated on any land which contains or supports important wildlife or plant species. If it is private land it must be with the consent of all owners, occupiers and those with legal interest in the land.

The creation of a NNR requires the making of an Order by the Governor on the advice of ExCo.

Where the NNR is on privately-owned land, FIG may enter into a management agreement with the owners and occupiers.

Some of the NNRs created under the old legislation have spe-

cific provisions in their designation orders which need to be adhered to. These orders restrict deliberate removal or killing of wildlife and ban the introduction of carnivorous animals to NNRs.

The legislation allows FIG to place limits on what activities can or cannot be permitted or refused within NNRs.

To date, regulations governing all NNRs have not been enacted. The only site-specific regulations which currently exist are in relation to the Patricia Luxton National Nature Reserve (Chartres) Regulations and the Murrell River Fishing Regulations 2006.

FIG encourages the publication of management plans which are currently in place for New Island South, and parts of Stanley Common; Gypsy Cove, Murrell River and Yorke Bay Pond.

It should also be noted that NNRs may also be the subject of other legislation and regulations.

For example, Stanley Common is not only an NNR, its status under the Stanley Common Ordinance allows the public a right to access the area in perpetuity. Some people also have rights to cut peat and other activities have also been permitted.

The Common is also technically a road under the Road Traffic Ordinance.

The landowner is responsible for the management of an NNR while FIG is responsible for ensuring the regulations are enforced.

The Lands Committee is responsible for overall management of FIG-owned land, with some tasks delegated to the Environmental Planning Department (eg securing access to Kidney and other islands and the warden service at Gypsy Cove).

Q Is it true that COLAS have offered to asphalt the entire MPA road while they have the machinery and man power here to do the job? If so, are Government going to take them up on this fantastic opportunity to put an end to the dangers of that dreadful road?

Councillor Gavin Short provided the following answer

A THERE was no formal quote from Colas, they indicated a figure to us of about £6,000,000 but that only included plant and labour, nothing for any materials, flights, accommodation etc, which when worked up by Bob was not unexpectedly the majority of the cost, and resulted in an all in figure of about £16.4 million.

This figure was put before MLAs and it was decided that in the present uncertain economic situation we could not justify raiding reserves of such a large amount.

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
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


