SAAS stoppage: director claims partners pressured

THE planned increased use of containers for the shipment of fish, meat and wool received a blow this week with the news that the Islands' only shipping service to South America is to end.

Hamish Wylie, one of the directors of the South American Atlantic Service Ltd (SAAS) container shipping company currently running between the Falklands and Rio Grande in Brazil made the shock announcement in a letter sent to clients this week.

Mr Wylie, who also is a director of SAAS parent company, Consolidated Fisheries Ltd, is convinced pressure has been put on the company's shipping partners to ensure the Falkland Islands fishing industry cannot develop any further.

Unacceptably high shipping costs caused, Mr Wylie believes, by pressure being exerted on companies who also operate in Argentina, have resulted in a failure to secure the volumes of cargo necessary to maintain the service, which the company has announced will be withdrawn at the end of June.

Stuart Wallace of Fortuna Ltd, who have already in the past containerised the whole of one ship's

catch and had planned to increase this volume, described the ending of the SAAS service as "a really very serious development for the whole of the Falklands economy."

The recently published Economic Strategy lists connectivity with South America as essential for the Islands' future economic development.

Argentina's systematic policy of interference with shipping between the Falkland Islands and Latin America culminated most recently in the Presidential Decree 256/10 which requires all shipping bound for the Falklands to seek permission from the Argentine Government.

Although "operational reasons" were cited, it seems clear that fear that the SAAS charter vessel Anja might face detention under the terms of the decree caused it to take a route around Cape Horn in its last voyage from Punta Arenas to Stanley.

After a period of uncertainty when the SAAS contract with the Anja came to an end, a new vessel, Scout, was chartered and a new route established between Stanley and Rio Grande in Brazil.

The original SAAS service be-

tween Stanley, Montevideo in Uruguay and Punta Arenas in Southern Chile was then abandoned.

Decree 256/10 was declared "not compliant with international law including the UN Convention on the Law of the Sea" by the British Government in a note verbale delivered to the Argentine Chargé d'Affaires in London.

The decree also appears to be in direct contravention of a 1984 "Treaty of Peace and Friendship" between Chile and Argentina with respect to the Straits of Magellan.

The implementation of Decree 256/10 is left to the Argentine Coast Guard, but their response has not yet been put to the test.

Mr Wylie said that while he could understand the unwillingness of the Falkland Islands Government to continue to subsidise the SAAS route – they recently and controversially made SAAS an unsecured loan of £1m – he felt that despite the fact that our foreign relations were the province of the British Government, the time had come for FIG to take a more proactive stance in revealing to the world the extent of the victimisation that the Islands were

suffering at the hands of the Argentines.

The Legislative Assembly member with the Fisheries portfolio, Councillor Gavin Short, described the ending of the SAAS service as "a very worrying development." He told the Penguin News he was sure it would be the subject of discussions with his colleagues, adding that it was "sad to see it stop."

Asked whether the Assembly had given any thought to challenging Decree 256/10, Cllr Short said the problem was that the government did not now own a ship of its own, and the owners of other ships were understandably very nervous by the mere mention of a threat.

With the SAAS service gone, the fate of a container lay-down park still under construction close to FIPASS must hang in the balance.

Estimated to be going to cost a further £175,000 over its original £945,000 budget, the work is being done by PWD, with assistance in the concrete work provided by Morrisons and equipment to be provided by CFL.

IN language unbecoming perhaps for Her Majesty's representative in these Islands, the previous Governor Alan Huckle once told me at a cocktail party in Government House that "I p*ss*d him off"

Reminded of this on a subsequent occasion, he first denied the use of any such vulgar expression and then said that what he had meant was that he found my ramblings in this column depressing.

In this, the first edition of 2011, I would dearly love to come up with something cheery and positive, but instead I find myself drawn to agree with Cllr Gavin Short who recently said to me "I expect that this will be a very difficult year"

Cllr Short was referring to the efforts of the Argentine Government to intensify the diplomatic war over our sovereignty which, although it pains me to admit, they seem to be winning hands down.

In recent months the Argentines have taken their message to Mercosur, Unasur, the Rio Conference on Climate Change, the Latin American and Caribbean Summit and the Spanish Latin American Summit, and seem in most cases to have come away with some degree of support, at least for discussions on sovereignty to take place.

Sadly, to have talks on sovereignty seems a reasonable idea to everyone except us.

We know that for Argentina talks can only have one acceptable outcome, which would not be at all acceptable to us.

Sadly, it is also a fact that if you say something loud enough for long enough, it tends to be believed, even if the historical and moral basis for what you are saying is rubbish.

Our principal problem is that we do not seem to have a voice in what continues to be a bilateral debate.

To the Argentine Government our democratically elected government is no more important than Dibley Parish Council.

Constitutionally our foreign relations are in the hands of the same department of the British Government which seemed keen to sell us up the River Plate prior to 1982.

If, for whatever reason, they are not inclined to do more than bleat ineffectually about infractions of international law in the face of Argentine attempts to close down our economy, we have an urgent need to redefine our status internationally before it is done for us.

NY Honours for military service

RUTH Hake, Station Chaplain at Mount Pleasant, and a former Commander of British Forces in the South Atlantic have been recognized in the Queen's New Year's Honours.

Reverend (Squadron Leader) Hake, who deployed to the Falkland Islands earlier this year, received an MBE for her selfless commitment and outstanding support to service personnel and their families.

Since joining the Royal Air Force in 2005, she has provided outstanding pastoral support and devoted countless hours to assist families who have lost loved ones on operations in both Iraq and Afghanistan.

While deployed to Afghanistan, Rev Hake, who is married with a small child, accompanied one Royal Marine's coffin back to the UK, presenting his beret and the flag that dressed his coffin to his mother.

A military spokesperson said Rev Hake also had been pivotal in providing pastoral and spiritual care to families and personnel of

Royal Air Force Benson, where she was posted in 2007, two years after joining the RAF.

She was "constantly putting the needs of others before her own and proving critical to the success of the station's welfare team."

Also appearing in the honours list is Vice Admiral Richard Ibbotson, who was Commander of British Forces in the Islands during 2002.

Vice Adm Ibbotson (56), who has two daughters and was born in Rawdon in Yorkshire, joined the navy in 1975 and has had five sea commands.

He has been honoured with a KBE - Knight Commander of the Order of the British Empire - for his work at the navy command headquarters in Portsmouth.

He said of his posting to the Falklands: "I was lucky enough to be able to meet people then who were returning for the first time since the task force went there, which showed the depth of commitment British personnel have made during my career."

Big week for cruise visits

CRUISE ships are scheduled to visit Stanley every day for the next week, with a potential 4,000 tourists due on Wednesday.

The Bremen (184 capacity) is due tomorrow, the Polar Pioneer (56) on Sunday, the Plancius (110) and MV Hanseatic (194) on Monday, and the Veendam (1350) on Tuesday. The AIDAcara (1339)

and the Star Princess (3102) are likely to more than double Stanley's population on Wednesday, before making way for the Expedition (120) on Thursday and Silver Whisper (382) on Friday.

The next scheduled visit is by MV C. Columbus (423) on Friday January 21.

Shares tumble down for Desire

HOPES of a major oil find off the Falklands were this week dealt a severe blow when Desire Petroleum announced it was abandoning its Dawn/Jacinta well, its fourth drilling attempt since last year.

Shares in the company crashed 23 per cent to 46p on December 29 when it failed to encounter hydrocarbons at a depth of 1,313 metres. They plummeted a further 23 per cent to 36.75p on Tuesday when it found "no significant hydrocarbons" at 1,670 metres.

Desire shares were a paltry 33.25p at close of market yesterday, their lowest since June 2009,

and a far cry from the giddy heights of 168.5p reached on October 11.

Not only are remaining local investors feeling the pinch, but such is the impact of the latest disappointment, analysts are now questioning whether the company can afford to drill beyond its five-well programme.

"We now believe Desire Petroleum has some major problems in that the company is now starting to run out of cash," Panmure Gordon analyst Peter Hitchens said this week.

Only Rockhopper Exploration has so far struck oil, at its Sea Lion

prospect, while Falkland Oil and Gas hit a dry hole at its only attempt so far, at Toroa.

Two other companies, Borders and Southern and Argo Resources, are yet to begin drilling campaigns.

Meanwhile, the rig used by Desire has been subcontracted to Rockhopper and BHP Billiton to drill one or two wells, before returning to Desire to drill a new well at a location still to be finalised.

The latest blow to oil hopes in the Falklands is compounded by news that crude oil prices this week topped US\$90 a barrel, the highest in more than two years

Oil info sought

A COMMITTEE of MPS looking into North Sea oil safety procedures said yesterday there was "a lack of clarity" over responsibility for drilling and oil response in the Falklands, and recommended the government clarified what regulatory regimes applied in the Falkland. Director of Mineral Resources Phyl Rendell said she would be happy to provide necessary information.

Tele-tories link

ASSEMBLY members representing the Falklands will join other members of the South Atlantic Territories Working Group in a teleconference later this month to discuss joint initiatives in tourism, conservation and other possibilities, which may increase the likelihood of the territories being awarded funding from the EU or UK Government.

SAR evacuation

RAF Search and Rescue responded to a medical emergency call on New Year's Day to evacuate a resident of Little Chates suffering from chest pains. Within two hours the patient was picked up and taken to KEMH, covering 160 miles. Sqn Ldr Holmes said: "We're always really pleased to help, whatever the emergency."

Case adjourned

TWO charges of assault against Claudio Briones Sepulveda (48) were adjourned on Wednesday to be dealt with in the Magistrates Court on February 16. He is already scheduled to be sentenced on this date for previous charges of assault and breach of a conditional discharge.

Tension set to rise as '99 agreement is questioned

ARGENTINA has raised the diplomatic temperature with Britain by suggesting existing agreements between the two countries have been broken and are therefore no longer relevant.

In its annual communiqué to mark the anniversary of what it calls "the British occupation of the Malvinas Islands in 1833," the Argentina Foreign Ministry says "understandings" signed by London and Buenos Aires were provisional, and aimed at "generating propitious conditions for the renewal of sovereignty negotiations."

The Foreign Ministry claims that the "unilateral actions" of the UK with regard to oil exploration and military exercises on the Islands constitute an "insoluble obstacle" to the continuation and development of "bilateral cooperation," and that they contradict both the "spirit and letter" of those provisional understandings.

This reference to the bilateral agreements signed by Argentina and the UK in July 1999 marks a new advance in the diplomatic war of words waged since the late President Nestor Kirchner came to power in 2003.

The communiqué does not mention any dates for the bilateral agreements, which were signed after the resumption of diplomatic

relations between the UK and Argentina following the Falklands War in 1982.

Fishing agreements were signed under the governments of Tony Blair and Carlos Menem, which are still in existence, but obsolete because Argentina no longer participates in the meetings of the South Atlantic Fisheries Commission.

A petroleum agreement was also signed, but was revoked by the Kirchner administration, which also imposed controls on shipping.

A ban on charter flights to the Islands was imposed by the Kirchner administration and is still in place. In August 2008 a candidate for the vacant post of Argentin

tine Ambassador in London was withdrawn as a protest.

The signing of a letter of understanding between the British and Argentine governments in July 1999 was the subject of much protest in the Falkland Islands, including demonstrations against the Legislative Council of the time and flag burning.

There were those who were angry at the idea of any agreement being made with Argentina and those who, while perhaps not against the agreement, were equally angry it had been made in secret with the complicity of members of Legislative Council, all of whom had been elected on the basis of pledges that there would be no further contact with the Argentine Government until it abandoned its sovereignty claim over the Islands.

Councillor Dick Sawle told the Penguin News that in his opinion the Argentine communiqué contained nothing new, adding that the claimed expulsion of an Argentine civilian population from the Islands in 1883 was "utter garbage."

He said it was interesting that the communiqué should mention the agreements of 1999, which had been maintained by the British but had been "continually broken by the Argentines."

One in four motorists had alcohol

ONE in four motorists breathalysed during the recent police crackdown on drink driving had consumed alcohol, figures released this week reveal.

A total of 20 drivers were stopped during the campaign, which ran from December 13 to January 4, mostly after committing moving road traffic offences. Two of the drivers were involved in road traffic collisions.

One was found to be more than twice over the drink driving limit,

and dealt with in court two days after the offence, a swift response described by Director of Community Safety and Chief Police Officer Gary Finchett as "an excellent example of simple, speedy, summary justice."

While he said the campaign had been a success, he nevertheless was unhappy at the proportion of drivers stopped who had been drinking.

Mr Finchett said: "I'm slightly disappointed that one in four of

the people we breathalysed had consumed alcohol, as even a small amount of alcohol can impair a driver's reactions.

"However, I'm very pleased that only one driver was found to be over the prescribed limit, albeit by a considerable amount."

He said the end of the campaign would not signify any reduction in police efforts to catch drink drivers, adding: "RFIP remains committed to targeting drink drivers in order to keep people safe."

December's mixed bag of weather

LAST month saw lower temperatures, higher rainfall and less sunshine than average. It also had the second highest gale days for December since MPA records began in 1986.

The mean maximum temperature was 13.4 Celsius, one degree less than average.

The highest temperature recorded was 22.5C on the 30th and the lowest maximum was 7.8C on the 13th.

The mean minimum temperature was 4.9C, compared with the 5.4C average. The lowest minimum was 0.5C on the 18th and the highest minimum 10.2C on the 27th.

The total rainfall for the month was 75.3mm, well up on the average of 57.8mm.

The wettest day was the 16th with a total of 12.4mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 16 days and 1mm or more fell on 15 days.

There were 223.9 hours of sunshine, compared with the monthly average of 234.8 hours.

The highest daily total was 15.3 hours on the 27th.

There were six days when snow or sleet fell and 12 days with hail, both double their respective averages.

There was one day with thunder and no days with fog.

The monthly mean wind speed was 17.0 knots, which compares to a December average of 15.9 knots. The highest hourly mean speed of 43 knots occurred on the 13th, and the highest recorded gust of 66 knots was recorded on the 13th and 14th.

Gales occurred on nine days, including three consecutive days from the 12th to the 14th. There were 27 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots.

Villain of the year Kirchner

The Telegraph writes: “Known locally as the Botox Evita, the vivacious, designer label-crazed 58-year-old described the Falkland Islands as ‘an illegal colonial enclave’ and all but threatened to start another war if an oil rig we had sent to the South Atlantic happened to strike lucky.”

“Why so upset? The question was partly answered by a leaked US State Department communiqué suggesting that Cristina may be a few steps short of a tango.”

After plenty of laughs and a grand day out in the sunshine, the event closed with a presentation at the Narrows Bar.

Plaques for first, second and third were given to winners of the Super and Classic Raft Classes. The Junior Class winners were the Sea Cadets whose valiant efforts saw them soldier on despite spending a long time in the water trying to board their vessel.

Environmental forum go-ahead

A NEW environmental forum, similar to the Falkland Islands Exploration and Production Environmental Forum (FIEPEF) which came into existence during the last oil drilling campaign in 1998, has been given the go-ahead.

Pippa Christie of the Mineral Resources Department, the prime movers behind the proposal, told last month's meeting of the Environmental Committee it had been her department's intention to wait until the oil industry entered into the developmental phase, but the increased volume of exploration activity currently envisaged made

the need to develop effective methods of dialogue on environmental matters between all parties more urgent.

Two possible models had been discussed for such a forum: the Shetland Oil Terminal Environmental Advisory Group (SOTEAG) and FIEPEF, but on the whole the committee agreed with the conclusion of the Mineral Resources Department that the FIEPEF model continued to suit the Falkland Islands situation and that its terms of reference provided a good starting point for the development of a new forum.

It was also agreed that any forum should be presided over by an independent chair, although Craig Dockrill of Falkland Conservation asked what mechanism would be employed for choosing such a person. It was further suggested that as telecommunications to and from the Islands had improved significantly since FIEPEF met previously, it should now be possible to hold video conferences, thus negating the need for overseas members of the forum to travel to the Islands for meetings, which would be both financially and environmentally beneficial.

Storms devastate bird colonies on Sea Lion

EIGHTY foot cliffs were not enough to protect the colonies of rockhopper penguins and king cormorants on Sea Lion Island from the effects of the storm force winds that swept the Islands in December.

Waves breaking with cataclysmic force destroyed the turret-like nests of the cormorants and swept through the nests of the rockhoppers leaving a trail of destruction behind them.

So strong was nature's onslaught on this cliff top position that even the boulders surrounding the monument to HMS Sheffield were moved.

Lodge manager on Sea Lion Island, Jenny Luxton, said none of the year's rockhopper chicks survived and now the adults were standing around forlornly, while the king cormorants, which have also lost all their chicks, appear to

be making efforts to rebuild their nests. In November, when the rockhopper colony was surveyed, the numbers appeared to have increased from previous years. Fortunately, Jenny said, the colonies of gentoo and magellanic penguins on the island do not appear to have been affected by the storms.

On Pebble Island, where the Meteorological Office reported winds of up to 74 knots on December 13, the wildlife appears to have been more fortunate.

Lodge owner Jacqui Jennings said she and partner Allan White had inspected the island from one end to another without discovering any casualties of the storm's violence.

Sadly this was not the case everywhere. Craig Dockrill of Falkland Conservation (FC) reported to the Environmental Committee that according to FC's observers

on the Jason Islands the gale force winds of mid December had been sufficiently strong to blow albatross off their nests.

Mr Dockrill also reported that a small sub-set to the north-west of the colony of black-browed albatross on Steeple Jason, estimated to be the largest in the world, had been attacked by what appeared to be a mystery virus, causing between 1,000 and 1,200 deaths among adult birds.

What was causing these deaths, which came suddenly to birds which showed no visible signs of distress or illness, would not be known, the committee was informed, until tissue samples had been analysed in Britain.

In the meantime the epidemic seemed to be dying out and FC was taking care that their operatives should not spread it among the rest of the colony.

Argentine ambassador comments condemned

ARGENTINA'S Ambassador at the United Nations has reacted to Prime Minister David Cameron's Christmas address to the Falklands by suggesting Britain should leave the UN Security Council.

Mr Cameron's assurance to Islanders that the sovereignty of the Islands would not come up for discussion is, according to Ambassador Jorge Arguello, an abuse of Britain's position on the Security Council, as it signifies that Britain has no intention of complying with the resolutions of the General Assembly on the subject.

"The time is coming when the international community may ask itself whether having won a war sixty years ago is sufficient to ensure a place on the Security Council in the 21st century," Ambassador Arguello argues.

Mr Cameron's suggestion that the only circumstance in which Falklands sovereignty might be discussed would be with the consent of the Islanders themselves, also attracts a critical and negative response from the Ambassador.

"So, very well, who are the Islanders?" he says. "Are they a people needing to be liberated from colonial oppression? No, we are talking about a population that was implanted after the Argentine population that lived there was removed by military force."

"It is made up of British citizens whose primary purpose is to use its parliament to block any attempt by the international community to reopen negotiations between its country and Argentina."

"Cameron knows that the 'Islanders' include a substantial proportion of soldiers who are there, not so much for the colony's defence as to sustain the illegal exploration of resources in the South Atlantic and to safeguard the military strategic interests of the British Crown."

The Ambassador's comments were condemned as "provocative and unacceptable" by Tory MP Andrew Rossindell, a member of the Commons Foreign Affairs Select Committee.

He said: "Britain's contribution to world freedom by protecting countries which have been invaded, both in the Second World War and in 1982, is exemplary. I am not sure Argentina can claim to have such a record - in fact quite the opposite."

Simon Weston, patron of the Falklands Veterans Foundation, said: "Mr Cameron is bang on the money to say sovereignty is a discussion for the Islanders. They have the right to self-determination."



Dashing Dancer adds gloss to injury-ravaged programme

NOT since 1944 – when three flat races, including the San Carlos Plate and Andreas Pitaluga Champion Race, were called off in a programme of 21 events – have there been so many events abandoned owing to the lack of entries.

No fewer than eight races were cancelled at the 2010 meeting, including such popular runs as the Berkeley Sound Plate and the Ladies (West Store) Gallop – the first time this has happened to the latter event since it was first run at the 1907 meeting at Whalebone Bay.

Additionally, there were too many races when just two horses went to post and the largest entry was seven.

The lack of entries was reflected on the Tote which took just £13,400, which was £5,000 less than last year. Similarly the biggest pay-out was a lowly £4.50 on a £1 ticket in the Armed Forces Challenge Cup.

Mention should be made of the Poole family, with Raymond and Nancy having been involved in running the Tote for around 20 years, and in recent years they have been ably assisted by their family members. Natalie Smith too has given sterling support for a similar time span, and they all provide an excellent service for those who like a flutter.

In all fairness the meeting, held in excellent weather throughout, did suffer from an unprecedented number of injuries which were suffered not only by the horses but also to regular jockey Arthur Turner, who sustained a serious shoulder injury just days before Christmas.

During the action which did take place Maurice Davis's thoroughbred Dashing Dancer (Pollerita/Thyer) chalked up her fourth win in the Governor's Cup, so equalling the performance of fellow four-time winners Tipperary (1923, 1924, 1925 and 1927), Mi Hausita (Feb and Dec 1963, 1965 and 1966), Mischina (1967, 1968, Feb and Dec 1970), Sheba (1988, 1989, 1991 and 1992) and Croacia (1994, 1995, 1996 and 1997).

Secret (1917, 1918, 1920, 1921 and 1922) and the famous Bambina (1933, Feb and Dec 1934, 1935 and 1936) both won the cup on five occasions.

With his regular jockey Arthur Turner injured, Maurice Davis took the ride himself and no-one would begrudge his success, given the

commitment he has made to horse racing in the Falklands since he first imported horses from Chile back in the early 1990s.

Tim Bonner's Zafonic, twice a Governor's Cup winner in 2005 and 2008, had to settle for the runner-up position for the third time when running against Dashing Dancer, who came home a couple of lengths ahead of the gelding.

Dashing Dancer went on to win a further five races (Seemedoit Cup, Speedwell Store Prize, Standard Chartered Trophy, Falkland Chase and the Simon Summers Memorial Champion Race) to rack up 18 points and win the Champion Horse Award for the fourth time (2006, 2007, 2009 and 2010).

Tim Bonner regained the Champion Jockey title which he lost last year to Maurice Davis, as he amassed 43 points with nine first places. This gives him ten titles and puts him ahead of Neil Watson (8) and Keith Whitney (7).

The official Champion Jockey award was introduced as late as 1963, but prior to that year the legendary William (Bill) Aldridge totalled 12 outright victories between 1915 and 1934. Tim's success started with the first event

of the day when his smart newcomer Rock of Gibraltar (Dory/Zafonic), voted Best Turned Out Maiden Plater, beat Seattle Star, owned by Raymond Evans of Pebble Island and ridden by Owen Summers, to win the Cable & Wireless Maiden Plate.

The 2009 Maiden Plate was cancelled for the first time since 1907 because there was just one runner, and this year's race brought just two horses forward, although five prospective candidates, including the offspring of Whirling Fireball, Seemedoit, Calimera and Capizana sustained unfortunate injuries and were withdrawn.

Tim scored further points when the excellent Ballanchine (Dory/Dancing Brave), winner of the Maiden Plate in 2006, romped home in the Diana Turner Dash, Argos Gallop and Capizana Cup, while Zafonic (Croacia/Dancing Brave) took the CFL Challenge Cup and Salvador Prize Champion Race.

Eric Goss's Thylinda (Lucinda/Thyer) provided Tim with further success in the Heather Pettersson Memorial Cup and Spirit (Iron Maiden/Dancing Brave), which is owned by Tim's son Declan, won the AG Barton Prize and the Billy Duncan Memorial.

Mrs Hayley Bonner brought her Ballanchine home to win the Chief Executive's Plate ahead of Spirit and Cheetah.

Ron Binnie has been riding winners on the Stanley race course for nearly 50 years and it was pleasing to see him wearing red rosettes once again as his sprinter Southern Dancer (Sheba/Thyer) took the Morrison (Falklands) Ltd dash over 440yds, and the Malcolm Binnie Memorial over the longer 700yds distance.

Thankfully, rumours which circulated prior to the meeting that Ron, the quiet man of racing, was contemplating retirement, proved unfounded and it is hoped that he will stay in the saddle until the 100th meeting in 2012, given that he participated in the 50th anniversary meeting back in February 1963.

In addition to his six victories on Dashing Dancer, Maurice Davis also enjoyed success on his improving Costabomb which took the Bike Anderson prize and, with 26 points, he finished as runner-up to Tim Bonner in the Championship Jockey Table.

Costabomb also took the Southern Cross Trophy for young jockeys with 15-year-old Macauley Davis in the saddle.

The ever-popular Port San Carlos prize, which stipulates that jockeys have to be under the age of 21 or over the age of 50, saw youngster Duane Evans on his Destiny beat the elder Owen Summers on Beagle (Tia Nina/Thyer). Another keen youngster, Dominic Watson, was third on Anastasia. Once again the Long Island troop contributed greatly to the races, thanks to the enthusiasm of Neil and Glenda Watson the farm owners.

The Dionne Jones Memorial Trophy saw Stefan Clarke chalk up a win on the Rincon Grande bred Serendipity, winning the Challenge Trophy, miniature and £100.

Two ladies gallantly came forward at the last minute and took mounts in the Ladies Chase, Angeline Clarke winning Barry Neilson's prize on Miami Lance, ahead of Michelle Amor on Dude With An Attitude.

Fourteen-year-old Chilean lad Jean Rebolledo marked his first appearance on a Falklands race course with a win in the Pinza Gallop riding Miami Dude, which is owned by his stepfather Maurice Davis.


On the third day of the meeting Jean scored again on Miami Dude in the Junior Rincon Grande and Home Farm Plate and, with 13 points overall, he won the Best Young Jockey Trophy, presented by Mike and Donna Evans. Jean said he was taught to ride horses at a young age on his family's farm back in Chile.

Ryan Watson, who was just pipped by one point for the Young Jockey title, was a popular winner of the Kool Kidz Cup over 600yds, bringing Gypsy Rose home by a neck to beat Miami Dude. Ryan made it a double when scoring on Serendipity in the Interserve Cup.

Thirteen-year-old Declan Bonner looks like following in his father Tim's footsteps as he followed last year's success on Southern Dancer by winning the Bobby Short Gallop on Thylinda, having just been edged out earlier in the Pinza Gallop on the same horse.

The Commander British Forces SAI Commodore Phillip Thicknesse enjoyed his second Christmas sports meeting and presented his prize to SAC Kim Lawton who rode Beagle home to victory in the Armed Forces Challenge Cup. Horse owners must be complimented for ensuring the military personnel had six horses made available to them for this race, despite the overall shortage of horses on the course.

Away back in 1910, just two years after the formation of the Stanley Sports Association, Andreas Pitaluga of Salvador donated a Silver Cup for the winner of the Champion Race, which featured only horses that had taken a prize at the meeting. Duncan Watson's imported Travedo won the race, ridden by John Perry.

One hundred years on and the Salvador Prize remains an ever-popular event on the programme. Historically it should be mentioned that in 1947 Alex Pitaluga took over the mantle of prize donor and in 1958 his son, Robin Pitaluga OBE, assumed sponsorship of the race and he has continued to provide the prize for the past 52 years.

It was therefore appropriate that Mr Pitaluga, accompanied by his son Saul and his two grandchildren, journeyed from Salvador to Stanley on December 27 and arrived at the course in the nick of time to present the trophy to Tim Bonner following Zafonic's victory.

The trotting events provided a clean sweep for the Shallow Bay (Hill Cove) bred Impulse, owned by Paul Peck. Impulse, which took the Maiden Plate Gallop on West Falklands a few years previously, and was second in the Governor's Cup a year later, won the Twigworth Trot with Paul riding, while his wife Davina trotted up to win the Ladies Race.

Bob Short substituted another trotting event to replace his cancelled Mile Gallop and Impulse held off a determined challenge by Bob on old favourite Charisma to complete the treble.

On foot, Thomas Burston won his first William McGill One Mile event in a credible time of 6:20 min, beating two times previous winner Zoran Zuvic by 50 yards.

Thomas was edged into second place in the 100yds by fast finishing Nathan Lowe. Nathan

also won the Backwards Race and the Children's Handicap Race. Jean Rebolledo took the 220yds and just lost out to Nick Rendell in an exciting finish in the 440yds.


George Butler, 78, showed that last year's victory over 83-year-old Billy Poole in the Veteran's Handicap Race was no fluke as he again beat the five-times winner by a few strides. Ron Binnie was third.

There are two "serious" foot events for ladies on the programme and Samantha Brownlee sprinted home to comfortably win the 80yds, ahead of young mother Pippa Christie and India Clarke.

Farms flock to Fox Bay for 24th Ram and Fleece Show

THE morning of the 24th West Falkland Ram and Fleece Show dawned under overcast and dull skies, but it soon became clear and bright, and the "bay" was beautifully still and calm.

This was an added bonus for the residents and visitors to Fox Bay Village for the December 29 show, who were once again anticipating a good day out and were not to be disappointed.

Keith and Ruben had already been working hard transforming the Woolshed prior to the event, and on the day they were there to take entries, some of which had already arrived by FIGAS. As usual the entries started as a trickle but it soon became quite hectic as the deadline for entries approached.

Once the entries were all in, Tony Mills and Lisa Pole-Evans set about the daunting and onerous task of selecting the fleece having the highest commercial value. They did this by working out the clean weight by estimating the yield and then multiplying this by the actual greasy weight. They then estimated the average fibre diameter before multiplying the clean weight by today's prices for that micron wool.

Once this had been accomplished, next was to select from all the rams that were entered in the five ram classes the one they considered to be the Champion Ram and Reserve Champion.

Finally they selected the Best Dual Purpose Ram (Wool/Meat) along with the runner-up as well as third and fourth place. They were assisted in this task by having all the rams bodyweights and fleece weights recorded on entry to the show.

A total of 55 fleeces from 17 farms and 54 rams from 12 farms were exhibited at this year's event. All entries had been carefully selected from tens of thousands of fleeces and hundreds of rams, every one a credit to its owner. By now the barbecue, set up by Tex and Mandy Alazia using their gas-fired pits, and this year cooked in the capable hands of Justin. Nuala and Tex, was in full swing.

This fortified all those that intended judging the three classes of rams and the three classes of fleeces, which now awaited them back at the Woolshed. Once this task had been accomplished, the time consuming job of counting up the judging slips took place, before the final results were known. These were all then competently collated by Susie.

The sheep used in the fleece weight competition was then skilfully shorn of its fleece by Ali and both the fleece and the sheep were

then weighed. This enabled the winners in the other competitions to be worked out.

The fleece weight, sheep weight and micron guess competition produced some very accurate results. It was also very satisfying to see ten entries in the Under 21s Sheep Judging Competition. Brian Aldridge expertly produced the master judging sheets to enable results from this competition to be worked out.

At 5.30pm a good crowd once again assembled in the Woolshed for the prizegiving, with this year's prizes presented by HE The Governor, Nigel Haywood, Captain Clarke and FIGAS staff kindly worked late to enable the Governor to return to Stanley afterwards.

The prizegiving brought this year's show to a close, after which the focus of attention moved back again to the Social Club until late that night. As usual the Southern Cross Social Club Committee did an excellent job of looking after the bar, bringing to an end another successful Ram and Fleece Show.

Sentencing remarks

YOU have been convicted of three charges of raping two little girls aged ten and 11 and attempting to rape a little girl of 12, and indecently assaulting two of them... Until then they were innocent children whose care and well being had been entrusted to you when they came to stay with you in Camp for their summer holidays.

It should have been an extremely happy time for them helping around the farm, but instead you used the remoteness of the location to obtain sexual gratification by the use of force...

Often in cases of sexual abuse of young children the Court can only guess at the long term effects. Here, as your victims are now adults, the Court does not have to speculate. It is obvious to me that they remain traumatised by what you did to them and... trying to as one put it, to bottle it up and get over it.

They are women of considerable courage. One of them, who had reported the matter as a child but no action was taken, when contacted by the police to say that you were applying to foster two children, felt that she had no alternative, for their protection, but to make a formal complaint against you, and then the other two felt that they also had to reveal what had happened to them.

They did this knowing that, if you pleaded not guilty they would have to... give evidence about and so relive their traumas.

By pleading not guilty you can be given no credit for sparing them that.

One says... she will never be able to forgive or forget what you did which has had a devastating impact on her life...

Justice at last for elderly sex fiend

SEX offender Colin George MacDonald yesterday showed no remorse as he was sentenced to serve 13 years in Stanley jail for abusing three schoolgirls while they spent summer holidays with him in Camp.

The 70-year-old appeared unmoved as Chief Justice Christopher Gardner QC, in his sentencing remarks, told him: "Those little girls experienced fear, confusion, humiliation, shame and embarrassment. You ignored their cries and pleas to stop. You destroyed their innocence and trust."

Mr MacDonald had denied three charges of rape, two of indecent assault and one of attempted rape, occurring between 1967 and 1977. The jury found him guilty on all charges. The three girls were aged ten, 11 and 12 at the time.

The trial took place over four days, culminating in his sentencing yesterday morning. As he was led away from court to the police cells, he attempted to shield himself from the camera, but otherwise showed little emotion.

Chief Justice Gardner said Mr MacDonald had taken away from the girls what should have been an extremely happy time, while on holiday with him in Camp, and instead used the remoteness of the location "to obtain sexual gratification by the use of force."

He continued: "It is difficult to think of a more serious case as the harm that you have caused is immense. Not only did you cause them physical pain, but also emotional and psychological turmoil."

Mr MacDonald elected on Monday to be tried by a judge and a jury, comprising seven members of the electorate.

The three women complainants gave evidence first, plus a further two witnesses. Mr MacDonald gave evidence on

Tuesday, during which he denied the offences had happened and accused the complainants of lying.

The judge summed up the evidence on Wednesday morning, and the jury retired to consider its verdict.

Two and a half hours later Mr MacDonald was found to be the lying party, as the jury returned unanimous guilty verdicts on the charges of rape and indecent assault, and guilty by a majority of six to one on the charge of attempted rape.

He was remanded in custody overnight and sentenced yesterday morning to 13 years for each of the three rapes, ten years for attempted rape and two years for each of the indecent assaults.

The sentences are to run concurrently, with a likely release after eight years.

Chief Justice Gardner said sentencing reflected his age and health concerns, but he was satisfied "no sentence other than that of immediate imprisonment" was appropriate.

"However," he added, "I also consider that I should take into account that the reason children here are permitted to enjoy far more freedom than is usually available in the UK, is because the residents here can be trusted to behave appropriately."

"Those who break that trust, as you have done, undermine the way of life here and must know that they can expect to be dealt with severely."

Mr MacDonald, whose not guilty pleas had forced victims to recount their disturbing memories to a courtroom after decades of trying to bury them, also is to be added to the Sex Offenders Register.

Despite the pain he inflicted, and the severity of the evidence against him, Mr MacDonald seemed to remain cold and unaffected.

The only visible emotions evident in the court during sentencing were from his wife and their daughter, who seemed genuinely upset.

Defence counsel Michael Haywood added: "On his release people shall be crossing the street at the sight of him."

Afterwards, Chief Police Officer and Director of Community Safety Gary Finchett said Mr MacDonald had "blatantly and arrogantly denied any wrongdoing whatsoever."

"Despite this, his victims bravely came to court to relive the experiences that they suffered as children."

"It must have been a very painful and distressing for them. All the victims showed great courage and they deserve our full support and admiration."

He said it was "not a day to celebrate" but instead a day to encourage anyone who could be affected by similar traumatic experiences to come forward.

RECENT days and weeks have been somewhat disconcerting for those who value the quality of life and our future prospects in these Islands.

The increasingly irritable belligerence of our neighbours has been widely condemned, although the relatively muted response of councillors and the FCO seems to rarely to have strayed beyond the hardy underscoring of Islanders' rights to sovereignty and self-determination.

Newly installed Brazilian President Dilma Rousseff last week refused permission for HMS Clyde to stop in Rio. As fortune would have it, Miss Rousseff is due to visit Argentina at the end of this month. Meanwhile, the entire Falklands community is coming to grips with the shock news of the withdrawal of the SAAS shipping service which, since 2005, has provided a much-needed container link between the Falklands and South America.

Should not our patience by now be wearing thin by these pronouncements, following on in the wake of other shipping restrictions arising from Argentine Presidential Decree 256/10?

Islanders do not need reminding that life here is tough, especially when reasonable expectations are dashed. But is it right that we follow our leaders and mutter phrases such as how "sad" we are when the undercurrent of opinion may be expressed in far more colourful terms?

Yes, Islanders will always resolutely proclaim their determination to overcome such obstacles – but is this almost silent stoicism the most appropriate accompaniment to what, for some, must be akin to seething rage?

If the sabres rattling in our direction are steadily becoming sharper, do we really want to maintain the image by which the rest of the world paints us – as being stuck in a 1950s time warp? Because that is what is trotted out by the media in the country which oversees our defence and foreign policy interests.

Our government representatives may be beavering about behind the scenes but, to many who occupy the rest of the world stage, they are working on behalf of a quaintly resolute and stubbornly polite populace. If there is deep and angry indignation, it appears not to be being broadcast beyond these shores.

I cannot be sure I have my finger precisely poised on the pulse, but I am a little surprised at the apparent silence, even on our letters page, which appears to be greeting so much injustice thrown in this direction.

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BBC panned for 'crass' reference

THE use of the name "Las Malvinas" instead of "Falkland Islands" in an episode of a popular BBC children's TV series screened on Christmas morning has caused controversy in Britain, according to a recent report in the Daily Mail.

In one episode of the Dr Who spin-off programme, The Sarah Jane Adventures, entitled "Death of the Doctor," a character who had travelled back from South America to Britain said he went "via Las Malvinas."

The Mail says the BBC should be reminded that 257 British servicemen lost their lives to ensure the Islands were liberated, and features quotes from personalities with Falklands connections.

Former Welsh Guardsman Simon Weston, who was severely burned in the conflict, says, "I can't understand why the BBC allows something so crassly inaccurate to just fly past on a children's programme."

Major-General Julian Thompson, who led the commando land force for the first phase of the war, says: "It is perverse. The Falkland Islanders would feel highly upset if they saw that programme. Only the Argentinians call the Islands by that name, so it would only make any sense if it were an Argentinian programme, not British."

There also is a forthright quote on the matter from Lord Tebbit, who was in Margaret Thatcher's cabinet during the war. "There is no such place as Las Malvinas, whether the BBC likes it or not. The Falkland Islanders chose their future and the Thatcher Government backed them. That's the end of the matter."

The article quotes a BBC spokesman as saying that the character in the series used the Spanish name for the Islands in context as he had been living in Argentina prior to travelling to the UK.

FOGL prospects show promise, says broker

FALKLAND Oil and Gas Limited has the potential to offer investors returns of 130 per cent in the medium term, according to the Jefferies brokerage.

Jefferies this week initiated coverage on the AIM-listed oil and gas exploration company operating in the undrilled South and East Falkland Basins. A target share price of 225p a share has been set, while shares were yesterday trading at close to 99p.

But for these potential gains to be met Falkland Oil and Gas needs to come up with some oil, and the last drill results from the company were not promising. In July FOGL confirmed that its Toroa F61/5-1 exploration well had

been drilled to a total depth of 2,476 metres, but it was then plugged and abandoned after failing to find any reservoir hydrocarbons.

The company said "Further detailed evaluation of all data and information gained from this well will now be carried out. An update will be provided once this work has been completed."

Small Cap News reports: "No sign of a rig for further drilling yet, and its joint venture partner BHP Billiton has since decided not to continue to the second exploration phase on the southern licences."

But it said FOGL was "keeping the faith" and assumed 100 per cent of its southern licences."


BA says Clyde port ban is an act of brotherhood

THE recent decision of the Brazilian Government to deny entry to Rio de Janeiro to the Falklands patrol vessel HMS Clyde has been hailed by the Argentine Foreign Ministry as a "gesture of brotherhood."

According to Argentine News Agency Telam, Foreign Minister Hector Timerman declared recently: "This measure shows the closeness of our relationship and is part of a structure of strategic alliance and brotherhood that we have created. This is not just confined to the commercial sphere, but also extends to the recognition of Argentine sovereignty over the Falkland Islands."

Newly-elected Brazilian President Dilma Rousseff is due to visit Buenos Aires on January 31 when she will have her first meeting with her Argentinean counterpart, Cristina Kirchner.

This week a spokesman for the British Foreign Office in London confirmed that HMS Clyde had planned to make a routine port stop in Rio de Janeiro in early January, but was not granted diplomatic clearance to do so.

The statement issued emphasised that the British Government respected Brazil's right to make such a decision and referred to the close relationship that the UK enjoys with Brazil. The UK-Brazil defence cooperation treaty signed last September was cited in the statement as "a good example of our current strong links."

A defence source has been quoted in the British press as saying: "This has no impact on our ability to defend the Falkland Islands."

Despite continuing tensions with Argentina over the Falkland Islands, the navy has until now enjoyed cordial relations with its Brazilian equivalent.

It is the first time that Brazil has refused permission for a British ship to dock in such circumstances, and the decision appears to be a clear indication that Miss Rousseff wanted to send a message to Britain and Argentina over the Falklands.

Some political commentators have suggested that Brazil's relations with Britain could suffer as Miss Rousseff "plays the anti-colonial card" to satisfy left-wing factions of her Workers' Party.

Miss Rousseff is viewed as a leader who will have to offer greater concessions to the grass routes of her party than her predecessor Mr Lula, who enjoyed popularity ratings of more than 80 per cent.

In the past, Uruguay has twice stopped British ships mooring in Montevideo to show solidarity with Buenos Aires.

On the last occasion, HMS Gloucester was banned from entering Montevideo for supplies and fuel in September 2010, despite having been authorised to do so days before.

Flag incident avoided by police

AN Argentine lawyer staying in the Falklands has been formally warned by police after reports that he was planning to raise an Argentine flag.

Acting on information received on Monday from airport firemen on their way to work, police stopped the man on the Bypass Road near one of the Rookery Bay firing range warning flag poles.

The flag he showed police was that of the Province of Buenos Aires, although Gaby Ceballos,

who interpreted for the police, claims he also had a national flag in his bag which he did not reveal.

Chief of Police Gary Finchett said the man was advised not to unfurl the flag in the Falklands and the "sensitivities and upset that that would cause" were explained to him.

The Attorney General has confirmed that the hoisting or waving of any national flag is not in itself against the law, unless it was likely to cause a breach of the peace.

Trade threat

US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton last year expressed her concern about possible Venezuelan military involvement in the Falklands dispute, according to US State Department papers published by WikiLeaks. The papers suggested the US believed the British had grown concerned about the extent to which Buenos Aires might escalate its campaign, and it appeared to be London's view that trade with Argentina could be threatened.

Dry spell advice

IT has been four years since the last "dry spell" but residents are being advised to be sensible with their water usage. "Damn this glorious weather. We've not seen any rain since December 18," said Water Supervisor Craig Paice, just before Wednesday's down-pour. He said the situation wasn't critical, but he asked people to act more responsibly, for example not to use a hose in the middle of the day.

Shipping links

A STATEMENT released yesterday by SAAS, which recently announced the closure of its service to Rio Grande at the end of June, said that recognising the importance of the service to the Islands economic development, the company was "concentrating efforts and resources on exploring all possible commercial options" on future shipping links, with the support of CFL and FIG.

Innocent minor

THE Attorney General this week approved the naming of a minor found not guilty of raping a child under 13. Brandon Keith Ballard Greenough (16) was on Wednesday released from court with no charge after prosecution counsel Ciaran Rankin entered no evidence to the charge and supported the not guilty verdict.

Fish kills vet

A FALKLANDS veteran has been killed by poison from a puffer fish in Sierra Leone. An inquest into the death of former paratrooper David Hughes, 48, who received an MBE while serving in Northern Ireland, returned an open verdict, but the coroner could not rule out "suspicious circumstances."

Record signing

PUPILS at Stanley Infant and Junior School and Camp Education will be joining a world record attempt next month for the most people signing and singing a song simultaneously. Organised by the charity SignHealth, the children are hoping to be among 50,000 taking part on February 9.

FI mine clearing is to be continued

THE removal of the Argentine land mines from the Falkland Islands is likely to continue late this year.

A spokesman for Government House announced this week that the Foreign Office had funding to undertake a small clearance project on the Falkland Islands.

The project is in the planning stage though it is hoped that work will begin in November following a visit to discuss options to be made by FCO and MOD officials next month.

Although no site has been chosen, Stanley Common is seen as a likely possibility.

The UK was criticised at the recent tenth meeting of States Party to the Mine Ban Treaty for a lack

of further movement on land mine clearance in the Falkland Islands, following last year's trial clearances of Surf Bay, Sapper Hill, Goose Green and Fox Bay.

The UK Government has repeated the expressed wish of successive Falkland Island Governments that funding needed for demining should be diverted to other countries with greater need.

Stuart Casey-Maslen, Mine Action Editor of the annual report Landmine Monitor 2010 said that clearing mines and providing funding to support mine action were two distinct obligations under the Mine Ban Treaty. It was not left to states to decide which of these obligations to honour.

Defence cut condemned

THE UK Government's "Falklands reinforcement plan" will be compromised by the scrapping of the Nimrod spy plane, according to a leaked letter from Defence Secretary Liam Fox.

The Nimrod was one of the high-profile victims of the October defence review and, in a letter to Prime Minister David Cameron, Mr Fox said its withdrawal would deprive the UK of one of its most powerful weapons.

He wrote: "The reduction in overall surface ship numbers means we will be unable to

undertake all the standing commitments (providing a permanent Royal Navy presence in priority regions) we do today."

"Assuming a presence in UK waters, the Falklands and in support of the deterrent is essential we would have to withdraw our presence in, for example, the Indian Ocean, Caribbean or Gulf."

Crucially, he also said the loss of the Nimrod would "limit our ability to deploy maritime forces rapidly into high-threat areas... and delete one element of our Falklands reinforcement plan."

Stricken ice patrol ship to be replaced at last

THE ice patrol ship HMS Endurance, which was withdrawn from Antarctic patrol duties two years ago, is finally to be replaced by a new icebreaker, to be named HMS Protector.

The flood-damaged Endurance almost sank off the coast of Chile in December 2008.

A 15-month investigation revealed the flood was caused by a valve opening as crew made a filter change.

The ship was carried back home to Portsmouth on a transport ship from the Falklands in April 2009 at a cost of £4m.

Originally, the navy said it intended to repair the ship, but that now seems unlikely because of the costs involved, thought to be about £40 million.

In Endurance's absence, the navy deployed the ocean survey vessel HMS Scott as cover.

HMS Scott does not have an icebreaker function, nor does she have the Lynx helicopters Endurance had. With the need growing

for greater exploration and mapping of unknown Antarctic waters, the navy decided to seek a proper replacement, and has put out a commercial tender for an icebreaker.

An advert has been placed with the European Journal of Contracts asking for expressions of interest.

One contender is understood to be a Norwegian ship based in North America.

The navy has refused to confirm this, saying the tender process has not been completed. The new ship will be based in Port-

smouth and will be able to fulfil the same tasks as Endurance. The official plan is to lease the ship as talks drag on over whether or not to repair the stricken icebreaker.

However, naval sources told The News in Portsmouth that the loan deal would be made permanent when officials decided to publicly announce the axing of the Endurance. The new icebreaker will be the sixth navy ship to be named HMS Protector - a name which dates back to 1749. She is named after the fourth Protector, which was an Antarctic patrol ship that served from 1936 until 1970.

Keith Towle, chairman of HMS Protector Association, who served as an Able Seaman on the previous vessel from 1965 to 1967, said: "We are absolutely over the moon that the name lives on because the Protector we were on was sent to the big hole in the sky in 1970 and we all spent many happy years on her."

Heritage grounds a factor in the refusal of planning permission

TWO applications for planning permission in Dury Street and Pioneer Row were turned down by the Planning and Building Committee at last week's meeting.

Chaired by Councillor Sharon Halford, and supported by Cllr Jan Cheek, two members of the Historic Buildings Committee also attended to assist in discussion on the two proposals affecting listed buildings.

The first of these was for the replacement of existing windows at 20 Drury Street with uPVC models. Juanita Brock made the submission and it was learned that these had already arrived.

After much discussion, which included reference to another dwelling in Drury Street where such windows had been installed prior to listing, it was resolved to accept the recommendation of Antony Payne, the Environmental Planning Officer, that planning permission be refused.

The second proposal was a submission by Mike and Jacki Summers for the demolition of three sheds and the erection of a two-storey dwelling at 12 Pioneer Row having frontage to Brandon Road.

This, too, was recommended for refusal on the grounds that the building failed to respect the established building form and would lead to a significant loss of amen-

ity, failing to safeguard the built heritage of this historic part of Stanley by virtue of its size, design, colours and materials. This also led to a lot of discussion and the recommendation was eventually accepted by a majority of members.

Attention then turned to the remaining 14 applications, and in each case the committee granted planning permission with conditions imposed in the majority:

- Erection of boathouse comprising dive centre and garage with creation of storage yard at Coastel 3 Access Road on Coastel Road for Phillip Miller

- Erection of fence on roadside boundary over one metre high for Roy Smith at 11 Brandon Road

- Erection of fence on roadside boundary over one metre high for Timothy Francis at 24 Callaghan Road

- Permission in principle for the erection of a dwelling with off-street parking at 2 Callaghan Road for John and Stephanie Thain

- Extension to dwelling, the erection of a garage and siting of container for storage for Edward Neilson at 6 Barrack Street

- Extension to dwelling at Hawkbit on the Fitzroy Track for Jon and Maggie Battersby

- Erection of a pair of semi-detached dwellings at 76-78 Davis Street for Stanley Services Ltd

- Conversion of loft into living area with inclusion of dormer window for Martyn Smith at 6a Ross Road West

- Erection of single-storey dwelling with integral garage and conservatory at 22 Mink Park for Ben Hoyles and Bonnie Curtis

- Erection of polytunnel measuring 10.9m by 5.4m at 13 Davis Street for Marvin and Trudi Clarke

- Erection of pair of semi-detached dwellings at 19 Mink Park for Tanya Curtis also Richard Bonner and Elizabeth Newton

- Demolition of the existing dwelling and outline application for subdivision of land to provide four housing plots at 16 and 18 James Street for the Estate of JF and EA Biggs

- Change to approved plans for the erection of a bungalow to the erection of a one-and-a-half storey dwelling at 14-16 Goss Road for Richard Short

- Retrospective application for erection of a steel garden shed at 6 Davis Street East for Richard Short

Nick Stephens, the Building Adviser, then reported upon the listed 18 applications made for building permits, noting that three of those where further information was awaited had now been approved and the permit issued.

The next meeting is scheduled for February 3.

Dismayed at our lack of effort

THE editorial in the Penguin News of January 7 by the Deputy Editor John Fowler left me feeling a little bemused and confused.

I presume that as he is writing on behalf of Penguin News, then are we to presume that the newspaper actually supports talks on the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands between Britain and Argentina?

I would disagree that talks on sovereignty seems a reasonable idea to everyone except us.

I know of many people in Britain who strongly oppose any such idea that sovereignty talks should take place, and thankfully the Prime Minister himself recently said: "There can and will be no negotiations on the sovereignty of the Is-

lands unless you, the Falkland Islanders, want them."

Therefore I would dispute Mr Fowler's assertion that talks on sovereignty seem a reasonable idea to everyone. With regard to the idea of "redefining our status internationally," as suggested in the final paragraph of the editorial, I presume he means that we should be thinking of becoming independent?

On this particular topic I recall visiting Buenos Aires in 1980 when I was Head of Broadcasting in the Falklands. I interviewed Snr Blanco who was then Head of the "Malvinas Department" and asked him what response the Argentine Government would have to the Falklands becoming independent.

There was a stunned silence before he forcefully informed me that "first of all Britain has to return the Islands to Argentina and then you have to ask us if you wish to become independent. There is absolutely no way that we could recognise any independence granted to the Islands by Britain."

The increasing pressure being applied on the Falklands by Argentina mainly through the shipping links to South America is a disturbing issue and the "blockade" is becoming more intense.

I am a little dismayed that our Legislative Assembly Members have not made a concerted effort to inform the British public, through the media, of what is happening.

It would be most advantageous, I believe, to have the bullying and cowardly actions of the Argentine Government made known through

as many media outlets as possible and, as we unfortunately do not have a public relations department within Government, then the Legislative Assembly Members must take on this responsibility themselves, and as quickly as possible.

Tabernacle undergoes £100,000 renovation

THE Tabernacle renovation is "practically complete," despite the terrible amount of problems the Stanley church has faced.

"We knew the building was sinking," Carol Eynon of the Tabernacle Committee told the Penguin News. "There was no wall plate and the flooring on the south side and entrance was rotten."

The project has so far cost more than £100,000, a majority from the Tabernacle itself, with £10,250 donated by local businesses and a grant of £9,415 from the Historic Buildings Committee.

The building was the first kit building in the Falklands, used as a church from 1891 and later expanded to include a school.

The shortcomings of materials back then meant it was built on piles instead of laying foundations, which have caused the most

structural issues. The outside has been made more child-friendly with a protective fence around the fuel tanker, which has been particularly helpful for the Rugsrats toddlers group, which is now using the building once again.

A second bathroom has been added to the property as well as

strengthening the building with new windows, doors, fencing, corrugated tin cladding, paint and flooring in the north and south entrance.

They are in need of more renovation after it was discovered that most of the floor in the main service room was being held together by the baptism pool.

The Historic Building Committee and the Tabernacle are in discussion over the north and south doors which used to flank the main entrance.

The doors were boarded over in the 1970s, and it was hoped they could be recovered, rubbed down and stained.

Unfortunately they were found to be rotten, and the work remains undone because the budget is already spent. Normal church services have now resumed.

Plaque commemorates first sighting

AN unassuming plaque in Dartmouth commemorates one of the most significant dates in the history of the Falklands – the sighting of the Islands by Elizabethan explorer and navigator John Davis.

The picture was submitted to the Penguin News by Falklands UK Government Representative Sukey Cameron, after discovering it attached to a house on the sea-front. Davis sailed to the Falklands in August 1592, aboard the vessel Desire. His crew was forced to kill

around 125,000 penguins for food while on the Islands.

They stored the penguin meat as well as they could and sailed for home, but the meat spoiled once they reached the tropics.

This made the passage home disastrous, and he brought back only 14 of his 76 men. In the next couple of years he published some



manuscripts and invented the backstaff and the quadrant, both useful tools at sea.

He later sailed to Cadiz and the Azores with his old friend, Sir Walter Raleigh, in 1596, and made further voyages to the East Indies.

His final voyage from England was one from which he was never to return. He left in December 1604 and a year later, on December 29 1605, he was mortally wounded while fighting Japanese pirates off Bintang near Sumatra.

Invincible may become disco

HMS Invincible, the launch pad for Sea Harrier operations during the Falklands War, may be converted into a Chinese nightclub. A Birmingham based tycoon has submitted a £5 million bid to the MoD for the carrier, which was decommissioned in 2005. Kin Bong Lam, chairman of the Wing Wah Chinese restaurant empire, said he wanted to buy the Invincible through his South China company Sunway Yachts, and move her to China for renovation. He was also considering turning the warship into a college or school. Tender bids for the ship have now been submitted and the winning bid should be announced within a few weeks.



Top award for HMS Gloucester

HMS Gloucester has been awarded the prestigious title of "Best Destroyer in the Fleet." The Type 42 warship, currently on patrol in Falklands waters, will receive the Fleet Efficiency Trophy on its return to the UK later this year. Meanwhile, the ship has been given a special pennant (above) in recognition of the award. Commander David George said the ship's company was "absolutely ecstatic."

March

THE devastating 8.8 Richter Scale earthquake which hit Chile on February 27 occupies the front page as friends and relatives in the Falklands Chilean community desperately wait for information.

Stanley Services announces a possible name change for the Malvina House Hotel and invites suggestions from the public.

American Secretary of State Hillary Clinton visits Buenos Aires, but reports that she has offered to mediate in sovereignty talks get a cool reception in London.

Seaview Logistics is the first local fishing company to put its whole season's loligo catch

into containers onshore rather than transshipping at sea.

Strong crosswinds are judged to have been the reason for a fatal accident on the Goose Green to North Arm road.

Strong winds, cold and driving rain cause Kenyan runners Joseph Kibunia and Henry Wanyoike to drop out of this year's marathon, which is won in record time by the RAF's Steven Frear.

Former Argentine Foreign Minister Rafael Bielsa calls upon his successor in the Kirchner administration to get tough with companies connected with Falklands oil exploration.

April

LOCAL investors in Desire Petroleum - reputedly one in ten of the population - saw their shares lose value as the company confirmed media reports that the first oil find by the Ocean Guardian rig is of poor quality.

Hector Cisneros, President of the Argentine Commission of the Families of the Fallen, is denounced as a former member of military intelligence during the dictatorship.

British Foreign Office minister Chris Bryant meets with his Argentine counterpart Jorge Taiana and claims relations between both governments are strong. Both sides agree there is "no return to the eighties" in respect of the Falklands, which the minister underlines are British as long as we wish it.

The Camp TV blackout finally comes to an end as many viewers switch on their sets for the first time in nine months, thanks to work by Power Station employees and SSVC engineers.

The final visit to the Falklands of the cruise ship Norwegian Sun on April 2 brings to an end a tourist season much affected by global recession and terrible weather. About 1,700 passengers have been prevented from landing, according to FITB General Manager Jake Downing.

An opinion poll of 1,000 adult home-owners throughout Argentina suggests that some 45 per cent have "little or no interest in the Falklands."

After joining Cable and Wireless as a junior technician in 1998, Justin McPhee is appointed Chief Executive of the company's Falklands operation.

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



Smoking ban carries on the spot fines up to £500

FOR generations the smoke-filled pubs and clubs of the Falklands have been an intrinsic feature of the fabric of life on the Islands.

But all that is about to be stubbed out for good when the much-debated smoking ban finally comes into force.

Ten years since "Health of the Nation" working groups were set up to clear the air on community health issues, Legislative Assembly members in November passed the Smoking (Prohibition) Ordinance.

On Wednesday this week, at an extraordinary meeting of Executive Council, the date for its implementation was agreed.

The national smoking ban takes effect from 6am on Tuesday February 1.

From that time, any smokers who light up in enclosed public places, enclosed workplaces or public vehicles risk prosecution – as do publicans and business owners who fail to abide by the new law, which includes the requirement to display "no smoking" signs.

Enclosed public places include pubs, restaurants, social clubs, hotels and shops, and public vehicles include taxis and buses.

The ban also affects businesses run from home, and the law will apply throughout the Falklands – including Mount Pleasant – with "very few" exceptions.

Police will be able to issue on the spot fines of £50 for smoking in breach of the ban, through to £100 for unauthorised interference with a sign or notice and £500 for failure by a licensee to comply with a duty in relation to licensed premises.

These fixed penalty notices may be issued immediately by a police officer, or subsequently by the Chief Police Officer or Attorney General. Fines must be paid within three or four weeks, de-

pending on how the notice is served. The law also provides for an offence of provision of false or misleading information to an officer, which carries a fine of up to £1,500.

However, a broad public awareness campaign is already under way, with detailed advice distributed via Gilbert House to employers, licensees and "other target audiences." Licensees, in particular, are being



told they also will have a duty to "take reasonable steps" to stop people smoking on premises where the ban applies, and bar and waiting staff are to be issued with guidelines which include a six-point action list of how to deal with a smoker who is breaking the law.

Businesses, too, are being advised to issue warnings if employees, customers or visitors refuse

to adhere to the ban. Few places will be exempt from the legislation and, unless a business is run there, the smoking ban will not apply in people's homes.

Hotels may designate bedrooms where smoking is allowed, and non-profit making private clubs may "opt out" if they meet certain conditions.

The smoking ban does not apply in large warehouses, garages and shearing sheds, with a minimum size of 450 cubic metres.

A statement from the Legislative Assembly said the ban was being introduced because "second-hand smoke kills."

The statement continued: "It also causes lung cancer, heart disease and respiratory illnesses in adults and a variety of conditions in children.

To tie in with the introduction of the smoking ban, the KEMH will be running a health promotion campaign to encourage people to give up smoking."

Police also have a huge role to play in ensuring the population is fully informed.

Inspector Len McGill told the Penguin News: We will, together with the Health Service, be engaging in a programme of notification and education to ensure that the general public and all businesses and individuals who have obligations under the new Ordinance are familiar with its requirements.

"Our officers will use their discretion when upholding this Ordinance and will give advice and guidance as appropriate to gain compliance."

UNDER AGE SEX TRIAL * ARGENTINA'S SHAME * YEAR IN REVIEW PART TWO

WHAT a crime-ridden society the Falklands must seem to anyone who has never been here, but has been reading the Penguin News in the past two weeks.

There's really no way around it, but this is one of the results of having a peripatetic Supreme Court judge who only visits when there are serious cases to try. Periodically the boast we proudly make to tourists that there is little or no crime in the Falklands seems just a little hollow, when a number of cases which may have been waiting months for the judge's appearance finally come to court.

Comparisons with other societies are difficult. Due to the small size of our population, each and every one of us represents a far greater proportion of our total numbers than do the citizens of almost any other country. This means that any statistics regarding the population of the Falklands have to be treated with suspicion, and so I have really no idea whether we are more or less inclined towards criminal activity than any other community.

What I do know is that if a crime is committed in the Falklands, pretty soon everyone claims to know about it. The real question, however, is whether this knowledge is acted upon or treated as anything other than a subject for conversation in the pub.

The incidence of two cases regarding sexual abuse in the courts recently, and the heart-rending letter from a former victim of abuse in this week's Penguin News, does inevitably point the finger of blame, not only on those found guilty in court, but also on all those who knew what was going on and, by keeping quiet, did not prevent it and thus themselves became implicitly guilty.

While, like the complainant against one aspect of the Christmas anti-drinking and driving campaign, I would not normally encourage people to "snitch" upon their neighbour, the very nature of some offences makes them difficult for the victims to own up to, and convenient for the rest of us to ignore. Child abuse is in this category; so also, I would suggest, are domestic violence and bullying.

In the same week that Penguin News heard from a victim of sexual abuse, we also received a much longer and this time anonymous plea from someone asking us to investigate bullying, not in the school playground, but in the hospital.

We don't really have the resources to do this, but there are those that do. That such an activity might go on in a place dedicated to caring and curing is shameful enough, if true. Knowing about it and staying silent to avoid embarrassment to our supposedly caring community would be even more shameful.

Three years for serious under age sex offences

A STERN warning to young men tempted to engage in sexual activity with under age girls was issued this week in the Supreme Court by Chief Justice Christopher Gardner.

Sentencing Matthew John Newton to a total of three years imprisonment for having admitted having sexual intercourse with three girls, aged at the time of the offences 15, 14 and 13, Chief Justice Gardner said: "These are serious offences and I am satisfied that no sentence other than of immediate imprisonment is appropriate, and I hope that other young men who are tempted to have under age sex will heed that."

In open court on the morning of Friday January 14 Mr Newton had pleaded guilty to three of the seven charges of sexual activity with children laid against him.

In the light of this change of plea, the court decided not to proceed with the remaining four charges, and the Crown's prosecutor, Ciaran Rankin agreed that it was in the best intentions of the witnesses that a trial should not be pursued.

Conditional bail was granted to Mr Newton until the court reconvened for sentencing on Tuesday.

Before the Chief Justice delivered his sentence, Mr Newton's defence counsel, Mr Michael Hayward had asked for mitigation on his client's behalf.

Mr Newton's case, his defence counsel claimed, was not that of a mature adult grooming under age girls for his own sexual gratification, but rather that of a "young and immature man" in his late teens and early twenties at the time of

the offences, who had formed "inappropriate relationships."

Mr Newton was not "a professional paedophile" and this was not "that sort of a case," Mr Hayward maintained.

In his closing remarks before sentencing, Chief Justice Gardner told Mr Newton that the law relating to sexual activity with children was intended to protect them when they were emotionally and physically immature. It made the male responsible for under age sex and imposed heavy punishments.

Chief Justice Gardner said that Mr Newton's assertion in his first interview that he would not have had sex with girls under the age of sixteen "because they were not mentally, emotionally or physically able to deal with it, and it would result in, as you put it, not a slap on the wrist but jail time" clearly indicated that he had been aware of the seriousness of the offences he later admitted to.

In addition to sentences of 18 months, two years and three years imprisonment, to run concurrently, the Chief Justice also made a Sexual Offences Order against him.

Mr Newton is prohibited from seeking to approach the females named in the order in any way, either directly or through an agent, and is banned from "any unsupervised contact with any child, except in the presence of and with the consent of the child's parent or guardian or other appropriate adult."

An exception to this order was granted for Mr Newton's own children, as his wife is expecting a baby.

General strike strands holiday makers in Chile

FALKLAND Islands residents returning home or travelling abroad on last week-end's LAN flight found themselves caught up in the consequences of the general strike over gas prices which brought the Magallanes Region of Chile to a standstill until agreement was reached two days ago.

Road blocks on all the roads out of Punta Arenas and at ferry terminals appeared from about midnight last Tuesday and caused chaos in the region, leaving tourists stranded in popular destinations such as the Torres del Paine National Park.

Lorry drivers from other parts of Chile and also from Argentina also were unable either to make deliveries or get back home.

With essential staff at Punta Arenas, including the customs and immigration officers unable to get to work, the LAN flight to the Falklands, which should have left Santiago early on Saturday morning, did not leave until about 9pm.

Fortunately for some 40 Falklands-bound travellers, including Tom and Larissa Blake travelling back from Gibraltar with daughter Laura, who checked in at Santiago airport at about 5am, LAN reacted promptly to news of the problems in Punta Arenas.

A coach was summoned and by about 8am they found themselves back in Santiago in a comfortable hotel to await further developments. Some eight hours later they were once again bussed to the airport and by 9pm they were in the air, bound for Punta Arenas in a

FOGL not discouraged

FALKLANDS Oil and Gas Ltd (FOGL) has announced that a site survey for their southern licenced areas will commence in 2011 and that analysis of recent results from their Toroa well shows no adverse implications for the company's deepwater prospects.

Tim Bushell, Chief Executive of FOGL, said this week: "The Toroa exploration well was the first well in a previously undrilled frontier basin and, although the outcome was disappointing, the full analysis of the data has provided encouragement."

The company will undertake further site surveys in the southern licence area, and in the meantime was continuing to work to secure a suitable deepwater rig.

plane significantly less full than normal.

Stanley couple Jason Lewis and Alison Inglis, travelling from Scotland with son Craig (9) and daughter Kirsty (7), were not so lucky.

Having planned to end their holiday with a relaxing couple of days in Chile, they arrived at Punta Arenas airport on Wednesday, oblivious of any problems in the region, but somewhat annoyed to find that their baggage had not accompanied them.

Not having their baggage turned out to be a good thing for the family, when it began to look as if walking was going to be the only way that Jason and his family would reach their hotel in Punta Arenas, some 24 kms away.

LAN staff were able to arrange a lift with a private motorist for Jason, Alison and children, but only as far as the second of several road blocks between the airport and the town. After this point, the family had no option but to walk what Jason estimated to be a further 10kms into Punta Arenas.

This long walk - some three hours or more - with children and

hand baggage took them past at least another two barricades.

Jason describes the barricades as being made up of lorries, buses and taxis and bristling with black flags and the blue and yellow flag of Magallanes.

Fortunately the protesters they met were friendly and helpful in guiding them to their hotel, where in time they met up with Christian and Rachel Berntsen and their two children.

Also in Punta Arenas, but at a different hotel from the Berntsens and the Lewis family, were Rowena Summers and granddaughter Laura.

Having been in Punta Arenas at the beginning of the week to witness the original protests about the rise in fuel prices, the strike on Wednesday found the Luxton family - Robin, Wendy and eight-year-old Nathan - just back from the Torres del Paine National Park, but stranded in a guest house in the small town of Puerto Natales with a group of Germans, French, Americans and two elderly Argentine ladies.

After registering with the Red Cross and a long and frustrating wait, finally with the help of the Chilean Army on Saturday the family found themselves on a military flight to Punta Arenas, arriving just in time to connect with the much-delayed LAN flight home.

Not so lucky were Simon and Catherine Catton and their two children, who were stranded for a further week in Punta Arenas.

Suspended sentence for trusted employee

DESCRIBED by the Chief Justice as a "valued employee" before it was discovered that in six months she had stolen £25,587.88 from the Kelper Stores, Marie Clifton (37) was given two concurrent sentences of 12 months, suspended for two years, in the Supreme Court on Wednesday.

Previously Ms Clifton had pleaded guilty to offences of theft and false accounting.

Mr Justice Gardner said that there were no aggravating factors to the case, but in mitigation, besides Ms Clifton's age and previous good character, was the fact that she had three dependent children and had suffered two bereavements and a relationship break-

down during the period of her offending. There was no evidence that the money stolen was spent on an extravagant lifestyle.

In addition to the suspended sentences, the Chief Justice also made a Confiscation Order against Ms Clifton in the sum of £25,587.88, the amount she had admitted stealing from her employers, and she was ordered to pay £1,800 prosecution costs.

A period of six months was granted in which payment of both amounts had to be made. Should payment not be made in time, the Chief Justice said a sentence of 15 months would be imposed, consecutive to the earlier 12 month sentences.

Prince Albert II (132) visits West Point and Saunders on Thursday, while Ocean Nova (84) heads for New Island and Carcass. Ocean Nova, Prince Albert II and MV Hanseatic (194) are all due in Stanley on Friday.

The Gypsy Cove toilets are now fully operational after FITB was successful in sourcing a replacement for a faulty part in the Islands. Concerns over the state of a viewing platform at Gypsy Cove, which is not the responsibility of FITB, have been passed on to Environmental Planning.

'Nude' scanner

A CONTROVERSIAL body scanner is to be introduced by security police at Santiago Airport from next month. The machine, which will be used mainly in the fight against drug trafficking, makes a person appear almost nude on the security screen images.

Someone reminded me recently that it is about ten years since various "Health of the Nation" working groups were set up to make recommendations that may, in the long term, keep down medical costs while improving quality of life. Despite the pessimistic prognostications of those of my colleagues who opposed the ban I do not believe we have other targets. Tobacco is unique in being a legal substance that is harmful in almost any quantity both to the user and those who share the same space.

I AM encouraged by the progress we are making on things like a minimum wage for the Islands and on succession planning within FIG. It is frustrating sometimes not to get instant action but I recognise that we have limited resources. More importantly each decision made may have consequences not envisaged in the original planning. None of us is gifted with foresight so it is important to work through any new proposals to ensure that no-one is unexpectedly or unfairly disadvantaged by them. Something that appears an ideal solution in the short term may carry too high a long term cost.

PARKING problems were raised with me by a number of people recently, both the lack of parking in the narrow streets in the centre of town and the general nuisance created by inconsiderate parking throughout the town. Some radical thinking is required – any suggestions are welcome.

Argentina's flagrant acts of absurdity and shame

Argentina has recently stepped up pressure on Britain over the Falklands by criticising British actions as "unilateral" and hence a breach of UN Resolution 31/49. This article, written especially for the Penguin News by Graham Pascoe and Peter Pepper, places this current phase of the Falklands dispute in perspective and considers which side's unilateral acts have been more significant. The background is as follows...

ON December 1 1976 the UN General Assembly passed Resolution 31/49, section 4 of which ran: "[The General Assembly] calls upon the two parties to refrain from taking decisions that would imply introducing unilateral modifications in the situation while the Islands are going through the process recommended in the above-mentioned resolutions."

At that time negotiations over the Falklands were going on between Britain and Argentina, and the Resolution, undoubtedly introduced at Argentina's request, was intended to promote them.

The section calling on both sides to refrain from unilateral acts was presumably introduced to ensure that Britain did not alter the status quo in the Falklands during the negotiations.

However, it clearly prohibited unilateral action by both sides to the dispute, not only Britain. The "process recommended" referred to here (as in earlier UN resolutions) was of course the peaceful solution of the sovereignty dispute over the Islands.

But all that changed on April 2 1982 when Argentina launched its armed invasion of the Falklands.

There could have been no more serious "unilateral act," and no more serious breach of Resolution 31/49. The invasion was also a breach of international law and of UN Resolution 2065 which had started the negotiation process in 1965.

That Resolution had called for peaceful negotiations between Britain and Argentina, but had not specified any particular outcome. It was only Argentina that assumed the result should be a handover of sovereignty, and the invasion was designed to secure that.

Every shot a unilateral act

In the aftermath of the 1982 war it became absurd to continue talking about Resolution 31/49 at all.

Every shot fired had been a "unilateral act," and both sides had acted as they saw fit, committing

innumerable "unilateral acts." Moreover, the Islands were clearly no longer "going through the process recommended in the above-mentioned resolutions," much as Argentina might have hoped that they still were.

Amongst Britain's unilateral acts after the war was the declaration of economic exclusion zones, and Britain also modified the internal governance of the Falklands with two new constitutions.

But subsequent Argentine unilateral acts were very much more serious. In 1994 Argentina put a claim to the Falklands, South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands into its new constitution. That unilateral act meant that the sovereignty negotiations it continued to demand could only end in a complete Argentine takeover.

There was no longer any room for compromise, and hence no room for meaningful negotiations – Argentina demanded everything.

More recently, in December 2009, Argentina also included the Falklands within the province of Tierra del Fuego.

That unilateral act meant that the Falklands under Argentine rule would be part of a small, chaotic, corrupt, and bitterly anti-British province, with the small Falklands population a tiny part of an overall Argentine provincial population that is contemptuous of Falkland Islanders.

Repudiation – a unilateral act

Another recent Argentine unilateral act is particularly relevant now: the repudiation in March 2007 of the 1995 Oil Agreement between Britain and Argentina under President Carlos Menem.

That agreement had signified Argentina's acceptance of oil exploration around the Falklands, and Britain had not broken the terms of that agreement in any way, as Argentina asserted in order to justify its repudiation. The Kirchner government in 2007 simply did not like the terms the Menem government had agreed to.

Argentina's unilateral act of repudiation was not only a breach of a treaty; it also allowed Argentina to turn logic on its head and accuse Britain of acting "unilaterally" – by carrying on with the oil exploration that Argentina had expressly agreed to in 1995 and had accepted without comment in 1998.

Companies that had been investing their money peacefully and lawfully over the previous 12 years were suddenly accused of acting "illegally."

To apply pressure on the Falklands over oil exploration, Argen-

tina followed this up with yet another "unilateral" act: decree 256/10, signed by President Cristina de Kirchner on February 16 2010, which required permits for shipping passing through Argentine waters to the Falklands.

Such permits were to be unavailable for any vessel or cargo connected with Falklands oil exploration. This was also a breach of the "right of innocent passage" enshrined in international shipping law.

Security Council Resolution 502

UN General Assembly resolutions are not binding on any country, whether or not they are members of the Security Council. But Britain certainly did its best to comply with Resolution 2065, and was complying with Resolution 31/49 too, until Argentina broke it so dramatically by invading the Falklands in 1982.

But Argentina conveniently ignores the fact that unlike General Assembly resolutions, UN Security Council resolutions are binding, and that it failed to comply with the crucial Security Council Resolution 502.

That Resolution, passed on April 3 1982, the day after Argentina's invasion, required Argentina to withdraw its troops and negotiate. If Argentina had obeyed it, it might have obtained an eventual handover of sovereignty, since Britain was willing to make major concessions to avoid bloodshed. Instead, the Argentine troops had to be expelled by military force, with considerable loss of British and Argentine life.

Despite the facts of the matter, Argentina continues to heap absurd criticism on Britain. Recently, one newspaper in Tierra del Fuego actually published the text of section 4 of Resolution 31/49 in order to accuse Britain of acting "unilaterally" over oil exploration.

But the article concerned omitted to mention that that UN resolution was passed in 1976, over five years before Argentina "unilaterally" invaded the Falklands!

If it had mentioned that date, every reader would have seen the absurdity of it all.

Argentine hypocrisy

It's clear that Argentine unilateral actions and mind-boggling hypocrisy are the real problem here – rather than any wrongdoing by Britain.

It's an old adage that truth is the first casualty of war, but in Argentina logic is a casualty now as well.

End of the line for ferry which delivered 2 Para

THE North Sea ferry which played such a pivotal role in the Falklands War is to be consigned to the scrapheap after 37 years of service.

The Norland, at the time the largest British-registered ferry, was requisitioned by the UK Government as it gathered the task force to liberate the Islands.

After becoming a familiar sight in her home port of Hull, from where she made nightly crossings of the North Sea to Rotterdam, the Norland carried the elite Second Battalion of the Parachute Regiment to the South Atlantic, who were to fight the first major land assault of the war at the battle of Goose Green.

"It was the Ministry of Defence who requisitioned the Norland," says Captain Donald Ellerby, the ship's master at the time of her call-up.

"I had just come from leave and they called to say they were coming to look at the ship. They came with us on the trip to Rotterdam and when we arrived back in Hull we were told she would be going to the Falklands."

"She was taken to Queen Elizabeth Dock, they started building helicopter pads on the deck. The rest of the changes were made in Portsmouth."

Sixty volunteers from her regular crew, including officers and stewards, sailed with the Norland as she departed the south coast port and sailed to war.

She left the Solent for the South Atlantic as a newly-converted troop carrier, with more than 1,200 men onboard in total.

An 11-day journey – including a stop at Sierra Leone, West Africa – awaited, before reaching Ascension Island.

To the knowledge of her captain, crew and families back home, the Norland would be going to within 100 miles of the Falklands shores.

But when the news came the ship would be sailing even further into danger, it jolted even the calm Captain Ellerby, now 80.

"It was a shock to everyone to be told we would be hitting the shore to drop the troops," he said. "The agreement before that was that troops would be landed by helicopter."

"It was during landing manoeuvres in Ascension that they discovered her side doors would be perfect for landing the 2 Paras."

On May 20, 1982, Norland was the first merchant ship to enter San Carlos Water, which was to earn the nickname Bomb Alley.

The boots of 1,000 soldiers pounded the deck into landing crafts which took them ashore.

Frankie Green, 60, an officers' steward on the Norland at the time, remembered that moonless night: "It was a very calm night. It was very tense and all the Paras' faces were blacked out."

After sunrise, San Carlos Water thundered with heavy fire from enemy aircraft.

"Later that morning the terrifying noise of klaxons filled the air as jets flew overhead. I thought such things only happened in the movies and that was when the reality of war hit home," said Mr Green, now a publican in Hull.

The Norland's closest call came when two 500lb Argentine bombs pounded into the sea only feet away from her.

"We were coming to join the rest of the fleet after dropping the

troops under the escort of Royal Navy frigates HMS Ardent and HMS Antelope," said Mr Green.

"The next thing we heard was that the Antelope had been hit. An unexploded bomb had crashed on deck and the crew were trying to defuse it."

"It just exploded, killing one person who was trying to defuse it, and she sank the next day."

Two days apart, Captain Ellerby and his crew had watched desperately as the sterns of HMS Ardent and HMS Antelope disappeared under the Atlantic.

Second-in-command of the Norland was Chief Officer Bob Lough: "The thing I remember most of that day was the noise of battle," he said.

"The naval gunfire support from the frigates firing their 4.5-inch guns, the roar of the attacking jets flying very low around the ship and the explosions as missiles exploded around us."

"We were in San Carlos for four days and suffered frequent air attacks."

When the bomb exploded on board Antelope and she sank, we took her whole crew off."

It was another shining moment for Norland and her crew.

When the war ended, the ship was returning to East Falkland from Uruguay, having delivered 500 prisoners of war from the battle of Goose Green.

While other requisitioned vessels went home after the conflict, she stayed in the South Atlantic, ferrying men and supplies between Ascension and the Falklands.

Finally, on February 1, 1983, the Norland was welcomed back to her King George Dock berth in Hull by flag-waving crowds.

The Norland sailed from Hull for the last time in 2002. Now its Italian owners have announced that the ship is heading for an Indian scrapyard.

MY friends and I are frequently hearing from those living here, and who once worked in the UK, where they compulsorily contributed to the National Insurance pension scheme and have learned to their great surprise, and anger, that on first drawing their pension it is a sum that is then frozen.

Or that it remains effectively frozen at the rate it stood at when they left the UK.

Thus it will not increase year on year as it would had they remained in the UK, or if they were living in an EU country and others including the United States of America.

Action is in hand to try and persuade the United Kingdom Government to unfreeze this pension world-wide.

One organisation fighting to achieve this is the Canadian Alliance of British Pensioners (CABP), of which I have been a member for a number of years. You can find out more on their website: www.britishpensions.com.

The fight for reclaiming our full pension rights is also being waged by the International Consortium of British Pensioners of which CABP is a founding member – their web link is www.pension-parity-uk.com.

Jackpot wins are just a scam

I'VE been working here in the Islands since some time now, and something suspicious has been happening to the people I work with and to myself.

We, as most of us in the Falklands, own a mobile phone, and since Friday we have received a very suspicious text message saying we were the winners of a large amount of money. To my surprise I got the following message:

"Congrats!!!(sic)Your mobile number has won 254,000 Pounds Sterling in the Ongoing (sic) NOKIA Mega Jackpot, for claims call: +44-704-570-6131 or Email:nokia631@yahoo.com."

Just like me, the chef of the place where I work got a similar message, this time being rewarded with 1.5 million, and late that very same day another person I work with got a similar text telling him to claim his £350,000 prize.

Since it looks out of place, such a random money giveaway, especially to be told to reply to a mail address different than nokia.co.uk, I decided to do a quick search in google, finding more people asking about the same issue, ending in nothing more than a money scam which works in the following way...

After getting the text message, the person gets an email with a form, which is to fill up to claim the prize.

This form asks for address, contact number, date of birth, full name and other personal information.

It looks like a stage to commit further identity theft related offences.

After sending said form, the person is asked to send a copy of his/her passport or driving licence to prove the real identity of the "winner" and as a "security check," along with another form asking for personal data, this time asking to choose the way to deliver the prize, which happens to be in cash.

The scammer asks for £550 for a 72 hours courier, £600 for 48 hours and £650 for a 24 hours courier delivery. They say Nokia (the company the scammers claim to

work for) will pay the insurance but the winner is in charge to pay for the delivery of the money in cash.

The person is hurried to send said information within three days, otherwise they will lose their prize.

I don't have further information of what happens after this stage, but I found via google that a credit card or money transfer is asked to pay for the money delivery, and even a meeting with this person sometimes takes place, since information as contact numbers and personal address takes place.

I would appreciate if you could warn the rest of the people here in Falklands.

My trauma of sexual abuse

GROWING up is difficult enough without added trauma and pressure put upon a child by sexual deviants.

Recent events in the Islands have made me want to write this piece, albeit anonymously, and I thank the Penguin News for accepting it as such.

My childhood was spent here and I was living in an environment of ever changing adult company. I was bright, well formed and a bit brash as I approached my teens.

I was subjected to inappropriate comment and touching of breasts and genitalia on a regular basis for several years.

I was also exposed to the male genitalia regularly, but always "accidentally."

I was removed from that environment as a young teen through circumstance and, although relieved that the attention bestowed upon me had stopped, strangely I missed it.

Therefore, when another adult male and a senior member of staff (remember that we started work at 14) began to treat me that same way it seemed almost acceptable.

I now know that it was not my fault that I attracted such attention.

This treatment undoubtedly forged my sexual behaviour for many years to follow – I became promiscuous, was abused physically and emotionally, sometimes I was the abuser (not sexually but emotionally) and never once gave my heart totally to one person.

I used and abused and buried the past deep within.

I always had a need to be the centre of attention, though, and delighted in telling my friends and others of some of my "exploits" – sometimes embellished to make the stories better.

It is only in recent years that all that went before came to the surface and resulted in serious mental trauma and a long period of aftercare and counselling from the mental health professionals.

I considered bringing my abusers to justice but those names I remembered led to the discovery that they were no longer alive.

That is my reason for writing this – if you are a victim of sexual abuse (it doesn't have to be full intercourse) then don't leave it too late otherwise the perpetrators will have died with that disgusting dirty smirk on their faces.



Survey team plumbs the depths of an underwater wonder world

SCIENTISTS from the Shallow Marine Surveys Group have recently returned from a groundbreaking expedition to survey the marine flora and fauna of South Georgia by scuba diving.

The shallow marine life of the area is very poorly known with only six sites previously surveyed by diving. Based on the MV Pharos SG for the three week expedition, the team surveyed 46 sites over three depth zones, along the north coast of the island.

They collected 2,270 specimens of marine invertebrates, and specialists working with the group collected an additional 120 sponge and 160 seaweed samples.

Project officer Dr Paul Brewin said it was an "awesome opportunity" to gather information about a unique environment. "I'm looking forward to spending the next year analysing the data collected and examining and describing the specimens."

Giant kelp forests (*Macrocyctis pyrifera*) and trailing *Himantothallus grandifolius* algae dominated the seabed, providing a habitat for stripy topshells, giant red sea spiders, limpets, colourful sea slugs and a variety of starfish.

Beautiful overhangs and rock walls were also encountered, covered in a vibrant array of sea

squirts, anemones and sponges. Cameramen for the trip, Steve Brown, Steve Cartwright and Dion Poncet, not only gathered quadrat photos for later analysis of species cover but also took some amazing footage of the playful fur seals which accompanied the team on every dive.

Specialists Dr Emma Wells (algae, Wells Marine) and Dr Claire Goodwin (sponges, National Museums Northern Ireland) joined the group for the expedition.

Emma said: "Although the diversity of algae is less than in the Falkland Islands due to the isolated nature of South Georgia, there were a number of interesting endemic species." Claire was particularly excited to encounter the

"volcano sponge" *Rosella* sp. in shallow waters. She said: "This belongs to a group of sponges called glass sponges which are normally encountered only in depths over 200m."

"Due to the fjordic nature of the South Georgia environments we found them here in only 8m."

The team of eight volunteers spent 11 days surveying down to 18m, a depth restriction imposed for safety reasons, as well as completing some intertidal surveys. Settlement plates were also deployed in three locations to determine if invasive species are present.

Dive Officer Judith Brown said: "The team coped well with the icy waters, with temperatures

down to 0oC at some sites. In total 64 hours were spent underwater without incident."

Dr Paul Brickle, chairman of the SMSG said: "The expedition surpassed expectations due to unusually calm weather, the professionalism of the dive team and the outstanding support of the Pharos officers and crew."

"Outputs from the survey will include geo-referenced information on species diversity which will be essential for future marine management."

South Georgia Senior Executive Dr Martin Collins added: "This is important work for South Georgia."

"It is part of a larger programme investigating the marine environment of the South Georgia Maritime Zone that should lead to the designation of Marine Protected Areas and enable the Convention on Biological Diversity to be extended to South Georgia."

Support for the survey was provided by the Darwin Initiative and the Government of South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands, with additional funding and assistance from the Joint Nature Conservation Committee, British Antarctic Survey, the Shackleton Scholarship Fund, Byron Marine Ltd, Neil McKay Ltd, and Sullivan Shipping Ltd.

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Book charts the remarkable lives of an amazing little wooden ship

AN English version of a book celebrating and detailing the three lives of a well-known and historic Falklands wooden vessel is now available in Stanley.

In 1927 an explorer and First World War hero, Gunther Pluschow, had a small but strong wooden ship called Feuerland built in Northern Germany.

Its intended purpose was to take him to Tierra del Fuego where it would serve as a floating base for his attempt to be the first man to explore this then little-known area and film it from the air.

While this first expedition was successful, a second, to Patagonia, led to Pluschow's death in Lago Argentino, when his tiny seaplane the Silver Condor crashed shortly after take-off.

By this time, however, his small ship had been sold to Captain John Hamilton, the owner of Weddell Island, and brought to the Falklands.

Here she was to remain for the next 78 years under her new name Penelope.

Most of this time was spent serving the needs of the farming community, carrying sheep, horses and supplies around islands and scattered settlements.

But, for a brief period during the Argentine occupation of the Falkland Islands in 1982, Penelope, now renamed ARA Penelope, was requisitioned to become the smallest ship in the Argentine Navy.

Serving aboard her as interpreter between the local captain Findlay Ferguson and her new

Argentine crew was an unwilling 19-year-old English-speaking conscript with pacifist tendencies, Roberto Herrscher.

His often hair-raising experiences aboard the Penelope were to change his life forever, and he realised he had not one, but many stories to tell.

Now a respected journalist living in Barcelona, Herrscher's experience on the Penelope set him off on a quest to learn the whole story of a vessel which was obviously of great significance in Germany, where it has now been returned.


An odyssey to Germany, the Falklands Islands, Tierra del Fuego and Buenos Aires, as well as into the labyrinth of his own and his family's memories and those of his fellow crew members, was to result in this book.

The Voyages of the Penelope is a translation from the original Spanish by John Fowler.

It is dedicated to the memory of Jane Cameron whose assistance to the author was vital.

It is not just a comprehensive history of the three lives of the ship first known as the Feuerland, then the Penelope and finally ARA Penelope, but also, through a series of interviews, introduces many of the people who have been connected with her during her long and remarkable life.

Department of Agriculture Wool Market Report
13th January, 2011

Jan Campbell, Department of Agriculture, Falkland Islands
The Australian wool market has started 2011 on a wonderfully high note, up 70p to a record 729 pence per kg. This is a real price increase, and not an exchange rate artifact. It is thought to be driven by a shortage of supply, with floods and strange seasons in Australia possibly affecting wool supply in the future. Demand for Falkland Island wool is very strong too, and we at DaA are working hard to keep on top of wool testing to get wool on the market. Farm incomes here will benefit greatly from what is now a sustained wool price increase as the shearing season progresses.

Star visitors lay wreath for the Merchant Navy

THE role played by Britain's Merchant Navy in 1982 was recognised during the recent visit to Stanley of the Star Princess, when Tom Christensen of Princess Cruises braved appalling weather to lay a wreath at the 1982 Memorial on behalf of the Merchant Navy Association.

Among the small group of passengers accompanying the Star Princess's Occupational Safety and Environment Officer were Sandra and Peter Morris of Bideford in Devon, who had brought the wreath on behalf of

the Merchant Navy Association's National President, Vivian Foster, who is a personal friend.

Mrs Morris spoke to the Penguin News about Vivian Foster's campaign to raise the level of public awareness of the Merchant Navy Association.

Among other activities, she has raised £50,000 for the first memorial to the men and women of the Merchant Navy to be constructed on Tower Hill in London.

Fellow passenger the Rev Alan Glover, who was accompanied by his wife Jayne, led prayers and

made a short address after the wreath-laying in which he referred to the valiant, but often forgotten service of the Merchant Navy during the 1982 conflict.

The Merchant Navy Association, which describes itself as a "member driven organisation" was established in 1989. In its website, www.red-duster.co.uk, it describes its mission as "to bring all serving and retired seafarers together in a spirit of companionship, consideration, and commitment towards a united lobby for the Community of the Sea."

Big airport expansion for Santiago

LONG queues on arrival at Santiago's airport from international flights may become a thing of the past when the airport is expanded to accommodate millions more passengers, according to a recent report in the Santiago Times.

The ten million passengers expected to pass through Santiago's Arturo Merino Benitez International Airport this year represent a 13 per cent increase on the previous year and exceeds the airport's designed capacity by half a million.

A new \$US40 million plan being developed by the Chilean Ministry of Public works will expand the capacity of the airport to about 14 million people a year. The renovation is expected to be completed by 2013.

The plan being discussed includes expanding the existing terminals, increasing the international police presence and modernising the baggage handling system. There are also plans to update customs and the arrival area for domestic and international flights.

The traffic though the airport is expected to continue to rise to an estimated 50 million passengers annually by 2045.

A better understanding of raptors and livestock

LAST year saw Falklands Conservation implement a scoping project to investigate the impacts of birds of prey, or raptors, on the livestock of the Falkland Islands.

This five month project had four goals:

- collate historical reports and summarise economic impacts of raptors on sheep farming
- to interview ten landowners to better understand their perceptions of raptors on their farms, lamb loss levels, and conservation status of raptors
- to undertake a preliminary census of raptor abundance in order to identify potential study sites.
- to field test various capture, marking and tracking methods for study species

Historically, shooting of birds of all kinds, including raptors, was prevalent across the Islands.

However, this practice has been changing in recent years, with shooting of wild birds declining.

We could not address the core issue of raptor-livestock conflicts without the participation and support of landowners, thus one pillar of the project was landowner perceptions of the issue.

We interviewed the owners of ten farms, covering many of the different environments found in the Falkland Islands. We found that opinion regarding the impact of raptors varied significantly, partly due to the presence of different species, and partly due to the different practices of each farm.

All of the individuals we spoke with were keen to see changes in the management of raptors to alleviate the problem, while having the least detrimental impact upon wildlife.

Another information gap was to do with capture, marking and tracking of individuals of each species. We could not hope to collect useful information without first knowing that we were able to safely and humanely capture the birds and follow their movements.

We tested four methods of capturing birds; one of the best for

the Striated Caracara was a simple hand-operated string snare, showing that complicated and/or expensive is not necessarily best.

We went on to fit leg bands to both Striated Caracara (Johnny Rook) and Southern Caracara (Carancho). We also attached GPS logging devices to a small number of birds, using a "backpack."

Neither of these tags had any lasting impact and, in as little as an hour from the tags being fitted, birds were seen to behave and socialise normally. We also fitted Turkey Vulture and Southern Caracara with patagial (wing) tags which was similarly successful.

In addition to tracking individual birds, we spent time observing lambing flocks on West Falkland, looking out for any interactions between birds of prey and lambing ewes or young lambs.

While we did see birds feeding upon afterbirth and some older carcasses we did not see any actual predation at that time.

However, this does not mean that predation does not occur as during this time several farmers reported sightings of predation by raptors. We simply didn't observe any in our observations, highlighting the need for a more extensive survey.

Given the successes of the past six months, and the sensitivity of this issue among the conservation and agriculture communities, we are hopeful that our work can be extended and expanded upon in the coming year.

We are currently seeking to undertake a more comprehensive survey of farmers and spend more time observing flocks for interactions.

Falklands Conservation would like to thank everyone who has helped out with this project over the last seven months.

Interaction is mostly beneficial

MUCH of the famous wildlife on the Falkland Islands occurs on farm land. This interaction is mostly beneficial; the sea birds and mammals bring in the valuable plant nutrients that are not only lacking here but are also being harvested in produce.

Occasionally it goes wrong - there are undoubtedly cases of predation by birds of prey - but the long term aim of the raptor project is to quantify this and to put this into perspective as well as develop preventative management systems.

Attacks on sheep are often birds simply cleaning up carrion, but they look bad.

As such there is no commercial loss and even a gain in fly control and nutrient recycling.

Unfortunately a lambing ewe or a new born lamb is temporarily compromised and attacks on these animals do represent a true commercial loss.

In the middle are the sick or dying animals that get attacked, often a brutal sight but again not the primary problem.

Our view at DoA is that strong, healthy and well fed animals are more resilient and less likely to be taken on by a predator.

However, we also accept some rogue birds are a primary problem, and we sit on the committee that issues destruction permits.

The bottom line, though, is that the more views we seek from the farmers who work with this, and the better understanding overall, the better we will be to manage the system.


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

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

Head for FICS put on hold

ASSISTANT Director of Education, Richard Fogerty reported to the Education Committee on Tuesday that recruitment for a new Head Teacher for the Community School had been put on hold whilst "discussions on possible reorganisation are held with the Director of Health and Education on his return from the UK."

The meeting was told that an advertisement placed in early December had brought forth a significant number of applicants for the head teacher post, who had now been advised of the delay.

Mr Fogerty said that the discussions referred to were between the Chief Executive and the Director of Health and Education and that he was himself unaware of what options were being discussed at this stage. The Chief Executive is currently in South Georgia and therefore unavailable to comment.

Questioned by Penguin News, Director of Health and Education David Jenkins said, "At this stage I can only confirm that a number of options are being considered for the role of the Head Teacher at FICS however, I wish to emphasise that these are purely considerations at the moment and that no decision has yet been made on the way forward. This is an issue that will be discussed further in the coming weeks."

Mr Fogerty confirmed on Wednesday that Acting Head Mrs Helen Bell, has agreed to continue to fill that role until the headship issue is decided.

New-born baby in Catch-22 trap

FEATURED on page nine among the other babies born in December is Renata Valeria Borquez Leiva, whose birth although she is too young to know it, has resulted in her parents being involved in a classic Catch-22 situation.

Little Renata is the daughter of Johanna Leiva, who until recently was one of the smiling faces behind the counter in the West Store's café and Rodolfo Borquez, who works for the Seafish Chantry.

The phrase Catch-22 which is used to describe any situation where rules are contradictory and impossible to comply with, comes from the novel of the same name by American writer Joseph Heller which was later made into a very successful Hollywood blockbuster.

The book's hero is a combat-weary American airman who tries

to get himself grounded on the grounds of insanity. Unfortunately trying to get out of his situation by asking for an evaluation of his mental health is considered by his superiors as being in itself a sufficient proof of sanity.

When Renata was born in the KEMH, Joanna and Rodolfo had assumed that she would automatically acquire Falkland Islands status and were disappointed to discover that since the introduction of the new Constitution in January 2009, being born here is no guarantee of status.

Disappointment turned to dismay, when the couple discovered that they would have to apply to the Chilean Consul in London in order to acquire a Chilean identity document for their daughter. This process, they were informed would take a minimum of three

weeks, but could, in fact, take much longer.

In the meantime, the couple's relatives in Chile are clamouring to see the new arrival and Johanna is especially anxious to show her new-born to her great grandmother who is old and in a very precarious state of health.

Johanna has been told by the Chilean authorities that she could travel to Chile with Renata if she took with her the child's birth certificate and a letter from Rodolfo giving his daughter permission to travel.

Despite this assurance strict airline rules mean that the baby cannot be allowed on LAN's international flight from the Falklands to Chile without an identity document.

As the baby's father, Mr Borquez obviously feels frustrated and is angry that his baby seems to be for a time at least trapped in the Falklands, a victim of a loophole, which may not have been provisioned by the writers of the Constitution, but which denies his rights as a parent.

In a meeting with Legislative Assembly Member, Dick Sawle on Thursday morning, Mr Borquez was offered help with the necessary paperwork, but advised that his situation, though frustrating, was one which had probably been encountered before by other work permit holders.

Biggest ever cruise ship day on Wednesday

MORE than 11,000 tourists will visit the Falklands in the next week, making it possibly not only the busiest week ever but certainly the biggest single day ever with 6,561 passengers from three ships expected on Wednesday.

Star Princess (3102) and Infinity (2449) are all scheduled to be in Stanley on Wednesday.

The week draws to a close with the Black Watch (868) visiting West Point on Thursday before making its way into Stanley on Friday where the Seabourne Odyssey (450) will also be visiting.

ONE of the responsibilities of a journalist, or indeed anyone like me who tends to pontificate publicly, is to get things right.

Last week, barely had the ink dried on the latest copies of the Penguin News when I discovered that in two instances at least I had got things very wrong.

In the first case, ascribing the remarks relating to the sentencing of Marie Clifton to the Chief Justice rather than to the Chief Magistrate, I was guilty of making an incorrect and unsubstantiated assumption, based on the fact that I knew Chief Justice Gardner was in the Islands and thought - wrongly as it turned out - that Chief Magistrate John Trevaskis was still abroad. I apologise humbly to all parties concerned.

Still smarting from a deserved rebuke from former Chief Magistrate Keith Watson, I received a phone call from Legislative Assembly Member, Sharon Halford, who holds the health portfolio, asking me what was the basis of my accusation of bullying in the hospital.

Reading the letter which I had mentioned in my editorial again more carefully, I realised that I had read it wrongly and that the writer had been concerned with all aspects of bullying in the workplace and had not accused any particular place of work. The hospital had been mentioned only in the context of using the number of people that it treats for work-related stress as a possible indicator of the incidence of bullying throughout all the workplaces in the Falklands.

I must therefore once again put on my grovelling trousers with the leather knee patches and beg the readers' pardon for a misleading accusation. The job of the hospital staff is surely difficult enough without having to deal with false accusations and I must apologise to them for any distress that my careless reading may have caused.

There were various rumours about the hospital in circulation some time ago and I believe it is these that may have caused me to make a wrong assumption - more evidence, if any were needed, of how dangerous rumours can be.

I am relieved to hear from Cllr Halford, that these rumours were investigated in depth at the time and dealt with appropriately.

If I may now get up off my knees and start sewing together again any garments I may have rent asunder as evidence of my unworthiness, I would hope that these unforgivable instances of sloppiness on my part do not detract from the message about individual responsibility that I - in common with Chief Police Officer Gary Finchett in our separate ways - have been trying to convey.

How our society conducts itself is the responsibility of us all as individuals. In the courts we may be judged to be innocent until proved guilty, but we should not rely on the courts alone to change the ways of the guilty or on the police to bring all the potentially guilty to court, without our help.

Farm worker dies in West road accident

A SINGLE vehicle road accident on West Falkland on Saturday has left one man dead and another seriously injured.

Gilbert (Gil) Giles aged 63 was pronounced dead at the scene while Alistair Minto (51) sustained serious neck and spinal injuries.

Both men were airlifted by a British International Helicopter to the King Edward Memorial Hospital in Stanley.

Mr Minto was medically evacuated to Chile the following day.

Both men were Chartres residents and were believed to have been driving from Hill Cove to their home in a 110 Land Rover.

The Brintel helicopter was covering for the RAF Search and Rescue Service due to both their usual helicopters being grounded, one for essential repair and the other for a routine engine change.

The closest landing area to the RTA was three miles away at Hill Cove and it fell to the residents to prepare and light that area in time for the arrival of the rescue helicopter.

Commenting on the accident, Director of Community Safety and Chief Police Officer Gary Finchett said: "This was an excellent response from the West Falkland First Response Team and the military which was not without its challenges. Members of the community on West Falkland acted with total professionalism and dedication on the night of this incident, particularly Marie-Paul Guillaumot and her daughter Marilou from Dunbar Farm, Tony Hirtle from Hill Cove and Dr Becky Edwards from Port Howard.

"This was a very difficult and challenging situation to be confronted with in an isolated area of West Falkland and these individuals, with excellent support from other members of the community, worked tirelessly and professionally together to ensure that everything that could be done for the two casualties at the scene was done prior to the arrival of the helicopter. Enquiries into the circumstances

of the collision are continuing and a report is being compiled for the Coroner. Our thoughts are with the families and friends of both men at this time."

An inquest into the death of Mr Giles was formally opened on Thursday and was adjourned pending the outcome of the pathologist's report and further investigations into the incident.

Mr Minto was still in the intensive care unit at the Clinica Alemana in Santiago on Thursday recovering from an operation to a fractured bone in his neck on Monday night. He was waiting to hear from an orthopaedic surgeon whether a further operation was required. His family were hopeful that he may be out of ICU in the next couple of days.

The First Response team on West Falkland is an initiative by Helen Marsh with assistance from Steve Dent, prompted by a serious road accident several years ago.

More than 20 people scattered across the West have now taken an extensive first aid course and team member Clare Cockwell said the incident on Saturday showed how important it was for them to attend the scene of an accident with the proper equipment.

It was assumed that a medical evacuation would take place from the scene of the accident, however when that was not possible, the spinal board and sufficiently trained people were there to safely shift the patient, said Mrs Cockwell.

The team are hoping to get another set of equipment together to be held at a location other than Fox Bay. Given the remoteness of some locations, the inclusion of a satellite phone could be the biggest life saver of all.

Plans are underway for a training course in the winter. "We'd like to see as many people get involved as possible, whether they are updating and practising existing skills, learning something new, or acting as 'victims' in an exercise for a couple of hours," said Mrs Cockwell.

Broken anchor prevents Insignia from putting passengers ashore

LOCAL tour operators were distressed on Sunday when the cruise vessel Insignia with 677 passengers aboard failed to put any of them ashore, despite remaining all day and into the evening in Port William.

The MPA Meteorological Office informs us that during the day the mean wind speed recorded at Stanley Airport was between 25 to 30 knots, which does not take into account gusts. It was not until around 5pm that the wind moderated slightly to just below 20 knots.

According to the ship's agents, Sullivan Shipping, these conditions, which by themselves might have been sufficient to cause a ship's captain not to put in to Stanley,

were compounded by Insignia breaking off one of its three anchors in Port William.

Uncertain as to the ability of the ship to hold its position and in view of the strong wind, at around 9am, the Captain made the decision not to deploy the tenders necessary to get ashore passengers for pre-booked excursions, though he left open the possibility of a free tender service later in the day should the wind have abated.

Sullivan's agent, Elvio 'Migs' Cofré who was on the Insignia's bridge in Port William says of the ship's Italian captain, "It is unfair to say he didn't give it a fair go."

Once the decision not to land passengers had been taken it would

have been normal for the ship to depart. On this occasion, however, Insignia had to remain to take on fuel as its next destination was the Antarctic Peninsular.

Bunkering from a tanker began in mid afternoon and the ship did not leave Port William till around 9.15pm. It was this continued and visible presence of the ship which fuelled the frustration felt by shore excursion providers, especially as the wind continued to moderate and the evening was fine.

While FIG benefitted from the payment of harbour dues and customs fees, the passenger tax of £18 per person, which would have amounted to £12,186, was not collected.

Re-consult RTO

REPLYING to enquiries as to what was happening with the new Road Traffic Ordinance which had been ongoing for some six years, Councillor Edwards said at Tuesday's Public Meeting that the weighty RTO was being delivered to the Assembly in four chunks. Councillor Jan Cheek added that it was the feeling of this council that there was a need to re-consult, she said.

Penguin plea

SOME scientists may be inadvertently harming penguins with the metal bands they use to keep track of them a new study says. The survival rate of King penguins with metal bands on their flippers was 44 percent lower and fewer chicks were produced according to research published in the journal Nature.

A LAN flight between Buenos Aires and Rio Gallegos on Sunday made an unscheduled landing in Comodoro in response to a bomb threat. A search revealed nothing of a suspicious nature.

New Islanders enjoy encounters of a rare kind

RESIDENTS of New Island have been fortunate enough to have had several encounters with rare wildlife visitors this summer.

Penguin News covered the visitation of a young Leopard Seal to the island's Protector Beach in October.

In November, a young Weddell Seal was found lazing on the beach at the North End of New Island – the very same seal then returned to the same beach just recently on January 14.

New Island resident Georgina Strange explained that Weddell Seals are rare visitors to the Falkland Islands; they are an Antarctic seal species which prefers the fast ice near the shores of the Antarctic

continent. They breed on the ice and maintain ice-holes nearby for access to the sea to forage for their main prey which is fish, such as the Antarctic Cod and Antarctic silverfish.

On January 5, a second Weddell Seal was encountered on a sand beach at Beaver Island during a survey of Dolphin Gull foraging areas. Georgina reported that both seals seemed to be healthy.

A Grey-headed Albatross was also recorded at New Island's settlement colony in December, and last week a Royal Penguin was found amongst the Rockhoppers at the same colony.

Georgina said, Royal Penguins breed only on the subantarctic island of Macquarie which lies in the Southern Ocean, about half way between Australia and Antarctica.

Royal Penguins are migratory but little is known about where they go outside of the breeding season.

Lots of posts but no signs

Councillor Roger Edwards said £100,00 for the signs had been included in the roads programme budget for this year and it was his understanding that it was a case of waiting for the signs to arrive in the Falklands.

MLA's first year allowances

Members of the Legislative Assembly's taxable allowances amounted to a total of £139,858 in the last year with Councillor Dick Sawle the highest earner at £28,438.35.

Councillor Roger Edwards representing the Camp constituency slipped into second place with £23,209.35 and Jan Cheek was the third highest earner with £20,666.04.

Councillors Glenn Ross and Emma Edwards received the least allowance as they are both employed by the Falkland Islands Government. This means that they are only paid when they are officially on holiday from their respective employments with the Power and Electrical Department

and Education Department.

Councillor Dick Sawle also received the highest allowance for attending local meetings and in this area Camp representative Sharon Halford was hot on his heels with Jan Cheek having attended just slightly less meetings.

Assembly Members are paid £126 per full day and £63 for a half day they attend meetings as part of their respective portfolios.

Reimbursed expenses are non-taxable and amounted to £12,802.07 for the seven members who made claims. Councillor Gavin Short did not claim any reimbursements. Non-taxable expenses include travel, accommodation, internet and telephone.





You have to trust us, Cllrs tell the electorate

THE lack of information forthcoming from the Assembly about the current situation with Argentina and shipping links in particular was a source of serious concern among the electorate, a member of the public told the eight councillors present at Tuesday's Public Meeting.

He said he appreciated their comments about not discussing sensitive issues in public, but there had been such a silence since the New Year that the electorate now needed to be told something. There had been a lot of negative press in the media but nothing in response. "Perhaps SAAS is commercial in confidence, but we need to know what is happening - why aren't you jumping up and down and kicking some arse," he asked.

Councillor Jan Cheek assured that they were all working hard in the background, while Councillor Dick Sawle said the bottom line was that the electorate was going to have to trust the Assembly.

Councillor Enima Edwards said she had recently visited the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in London and had spelt out in very basic language the effect Argentina's programmes were having on the Falklands. She said it was her belief from those

discussions that the FCO was working very hard on the Falklands behalf.

Councillor Gavin Short said that as he saw it, stealth was the only way anything positive could be achieved.

There should be a more robust response to Argentina's actions, was the view of Councillor Bill Luxton which was backed up from the floor by a member of the public who said that about a year ago the FCO had also said they would like to see a more robust stance from the Falklands. The propaganda and negative media had little effect on the Falklands population, but the perception of the outside world was a concern, he said.

It was agreed that people should continue to get the Falklands story across where possible and that by writing to national and regional newspapers was one way of reaching a broad

spectrum of the British public as well as on online forums.

Councillor Sharon Halford noted that tour guides and local drivers could also spread the word while one tour guide said he handed out a 44 page booklet by Graham Pascoe and Peter Pepper called Getting it Right (www.falklandshistory.org) to interested passengers

in the hope they would read if not all of it, at least the summary which gives an excellent overall view of Falklands history.

In the meantime in conjunction with FIG, Edelman, the world's largest independent public relations firm are working on the PR Strategy for the Falkland Islands. Their remit includes the requirement to provide strategic and tactical advice to FIG in relation to all public relations and media issues internationally (particularly the European Union, the United States and South America) in the UK and in the Falkland Islands.

The Public Affairs arm of Edelman have worked with FIG since 2003. The FIG sought expressions of interest from PR companies and Edelman were selected after a detailed process of interviews and presentations.

The PR budget is £64,000 per annum.

CCTV puts shoplifters in the frame

THIS week three members of the public, believed to be military, received citeable cautions for obtaining property by deception following a successful criminal investigation.

The investigation was greatly assisted by extensive CCTV footage from new cameras, recently installed throughout the sales area of the Seafish Chandlery, from the shop's electronic sales records and staff members.

The individuals were caught on CCTV interfering with certain items of stock, then purporting to

pay for them at the cash desks, before exiting the Seafish Chandlery. Chandlery Manager Neville Hayward said he was very pleased his company's investment in CCTV and other security systems was paying dividends.

In his view, the successful outcome showed that CCTV does work, and that it can and will be used to identify shoplifters and bring them to justice.

Inspector Len McGill fully endorsed Mr Hayward's comments and acknowledged the extensive assistance afforded the in-

vestigation by the CCTV footage and the Chandlery staff.

He pointed out that shoplifting, in all its forms, is a crime which affects everyone because retailers are forced to pass on their losses from shoplifting to honest customers.

For this reason, shoplifting and related activities are considered serious offences. He said the Police would rigorously investigate such incidents with a view to bringing perpetrators to justice and would use all means at their disposal, to achieve it.

New fire appliance doesn't make the grade

EFFORTS to encourage the British Antarctic Survey Dash 7 aircraft back to Stanley airport on their routine journeys to Antarctica have been delayed after the necessary fire appliance was delivered with defects.

The aim was to purchase a Category 2 fire appliance which would meet the safety requirements of the Dash 7 which

had been regular visitors to the Islands for many years until new ASSI regulations prevented the familiar aircraft from landing at Stanley Airport.

Councillor Jan Cheek said at Tuesday's Public Meeting that the appliance had been purchased within the £130,000 budget agreed by Executive Council in 2008 and at the time of the decision, it had

also been considered a possibility that oil companies may wish to operate from Stanley Airport subject to safety regulations.

She said however that more adjustments were required to make it Category 2 compatible and that the suppliers had visited at their expense to attempt to rectify the situation. The delay was unfortunate, she added.

The Battle of Waterloo was a great allied victory but it did prevent the Emperor Napoleon from fulfilling his pledge to repeal what was left of the metric system. If he had the world would be turning a lot more efficiently and economically.

As a mathematician he understood that any system based on a miscalculation and that by its nature is beset by vulgar fractions is a waste of time and money (how many times can you divide 12 and get whole numbers and how many 10!)

The biggest fallacy in Mr Glass' letter is that any country, including Australia, is metric. No country in the World is fully metric and it is extremely unlikely that any will ever be. Just consider that all measurement of time and global geography is non-metric. All nautical distances and speeds are non-metric, and this means that virtually all astronomical measurement is non-metric.

The future does not look rosy for the metric system and it is worth mentioning that many of the international scientific standard measurements are not metric at all but have been called "metric" to make it look as though the system is universal.

Mr Glass may of course have been thinking of trade advantages from the Falklands taking this step but if so might have considered that the greatest economy in the world for the foreseeable future (despite the advances of China, itself largely non-metric) the USA has turned its back on metrification.

In a surge of enthusiasm some years ago a few states passed legislation to enable metrification but non took any real steps to implement this and virtually all have now repealed those laws. Even in Europe, which should be a bastion of metrification, many customary measures are used - can you yet get a metric screw in Germany?

I leave you with a final thought based on my 30 years as a computer professional: no computer software system that has ever been made and probably none that ever will be made is metric. The extra cost of adding bodging arithmetic units to computers is astronomical - the Duke of Wellington has a lot to answer for!

Necessary to keep Nimrod

I WRITE on behalf of colleagues at BAE Systems where the Nimrod MRA4s aircraft were being built to make you aware of the serious impact their cancellation will have upon the ongoing defence of the Falkland Islands.

The Coalition government in the UK last year undertook a Strategic Defence and Security Review (SDSR) which resulted in both the cancellation of the Nimrod MRA4s and the early withdrawal from service of HMS Ark Royal. This represented a double blow to the security of the Falkland Islands as without the former it is far more difficult to defend them and without the latter it is now impossible to retake them in the event of an invasion.

For your information, the Nimrod MRA4s are maritime recon

naissance aircraft. They have a wide range of capabilities, including intelligence, surveillance, target acquisition and reconnaissance (ISTAR), submarine detection and attack (using torpedoes and depth charges), surface ship detection and attack, air to air defence (with sidewinder missiles) and search and rescue. They also have a 6000 mile range without refuelling and can stay in flight for 15 hours. They can scan an area the size of Britain every ten seconds.

These aircraft are fully paid for with two complete and the others almost complete and clearly would have been very important to assist in the defence (and warning of any impending attack) of the Falkland Islands. Furthermore, you do not have to take my word for it. Here is what the current secretary of defence, Dr Liam Fox, stated in a leaked letter to the Prime Minister prior to completion of the SDR:

"Deletion of the Nimrod MR4 will limit our ability to deploy maritime forces rapidly into high-threat areas, increase the risk to the Deterrent, compromise maritime CT (counter terrorism), remove long range search and rescue, and delete one element of our Falklands reinforcement plan."

Admiral Sir Mark Stanhope after the SDR was completed stated he was "very uncomfortable" and did not "welcome the loss of Nimrod".

We have been trying to raise the impact of the cancellation of these aircraft with the press and media in the UK and with MPs, but with limited success. This is despite their cancellation representing a waste of £4bn! We have also written to the Prime Minister.

We felt that the people of the Falkland Islands would be interested to hear of the increased risk that the Falklands are under as a result of the loss of the Nimrods.

The UK government may well say that the loss of the Nimrods can be covered by other means, but the seas around the Falkland Islands encompass a very large area and no ship nor submarine can possibly cover such a large area. In addition, the Typhoon aircraft based on the Islands are very limited in their capability compared to the Nimrods; they are simply not designed for surveillance.

Our interest in this matter is four fold. Firstly, as citizens of the UK we feel that cancelling the Nimrods is putting the defence of the UK and its territories at risk. Secondly, having spent years developing and building these aircraft, it is quite galling to now have to cut them up for scrap metal (literally), thirdly this represents a huge waste of money, £4bn to be precise (from ministerial answers to questions) and fourthly it will cost jobs at both BAE Systems in Warton (noting that Woodford where the planes are being built was to close anyway) and at RAF Kinloss.

Hopefully this will be of interest to you and if it means that ei-

ther your paper or the Island's residents are motivated to raise this with the British press and media and MPs then so much the better.

- 3.) What is the average cost of living?
- 4.) While I recognize there are multiple industries related to the tourist trade, what "skill sets" are most needed there?
- 5.) What type of immigration restrictions would exist for an "artist/retiree", or anyone who wished to maintain a temporary or permanent residence?
- 6.) Does a felony conviction preclude being allowed entry into your country?

My primary interest is in finding a reasonably quiet place where I can pursue artistic endeavors, but I feel compelled to work in the "greater community", focused mostly on health care and substance abuse counselling, or other functions. When I leave prison in 2012, I will be 50 years of age, reasonably healthy, and unattached.

Finally, I would greatly appreciate a copy of The Penguin News, because prisoners do not have internet access. It would help my understanding of current local events and concerns.

Working to save native fish species: Darwin Initiative zebra trout group

AMONG the travellers inconvenienced by the delay in the LAN flight last weekend were a group who had spent the previous week wading about the streams of Lafonia and were now heading for Puerto Montt in Chile to do the same.

Leader of the group was Spanish scientist, Dr Carlos Garcia de Leaniz from Swansea University in Wales who is the supervisor of a Darwin Initiative project set up to study and protect a group of native fish known as Galaxiids, of which one type is commonly known in the Falklands as zebra trout.

With Dr Garcia were his wife, Dr Sonia Consevra, from Aberystwyth University, who is the group's geneticist, José Sanzana from the Universidad de Los Lagos in Chile and Daniel Fowler who formerly ran the FIDC's fish-farming study project in the Falklands and now works on the Galaxiids study in the Falkland Islands.

The Darwin Initiative, which has recently funded other scientific projects in the Falklands such

as the recent and on-going raptor study was set up by the British Government's Department of Food Resources and Agriculture (DEFRA) to help fund scientific projects in countries which are rich

in terms of biodiversity, but lacking in available cash to devote to such things.

Dr Garcia told Penguin News that the Galaxiids Project had three main aims in the Falklands, the first of which was to establish a breeding programme to be able to re-introduce zebra trout into the wild in sufficient numbers to ensure the viability of the population.

Along with trying to revive the zebra trout population was the need to discover the reasons for its decline in the species. This had been largely attributed in the past to the introduction of brown trout, said Dr Garcia, but added that the evidence for this was circumstantial and needed to be investigated.

Education, dissemination of information and building capacity were at the heart of the project's third aspect. Dr Garcia said that he hoped the project would engage with the local community, including young people and anglers.

Asked what were the perceived benefits of protecting or re-establishing a non-commercial fish species such as zebra trout, Dr Garcia said that first of all it was a very rare species found only in Chile, Argentina and the Falklands, where it was an important part of the Islands' diversity – perhaps the most characteristic and unique species in the aquatic environment.

Agreeing to the suggestion that they are like canaries in a coal mine, Dr Garcia said that, "Zebra trout are a very good indicator of envi-

ronmental change – good sentinels and value indicators.

They can help us to understand how changes in climate and changes in land use may be affecting the environment in which we live and therefore, our lives. Like the most important things in life, you cannot put a price tag on it."

As well as involving the universities of Swansea and Aberystwyth in Wales, the project is being carried in collaboration with partners in the USA: Oregon State University and the US Geological Survey, in Chile the University of Los Lagos and the Environmental Planning Department of the Falkland Islands Government.

Geneticist Dr Sonia Consevra explained that up till now it was thought that the zebra trout in the Falklands was a single species, but what had been found in a previous project in Chile was that there were two species, very similar, but different species and both called zebra trout. The sampling that the team have been carrying out in streams and rivers of the East Falklands suggests that the same case applies here.

Charity not just FIC token effort

THE significance of the green plastic tokens that shoppers at West Store have been getting with their change since the end of November was revealed on Wednesday morning last week.

While early morning shoppers waited for the store to open, representatives of the Stephen Jaffray Memorial Fund, the Cathedral and the Lighthouse Seamens' Mission gathered at the south entrance of the West Store waiting to receive cheques from the Falkland Islands Company (FIC).

FIC Executive Manager, Eva Jaffray, who presented the cheques, explained that the green tokens and the choice of three boxes representing local charities into which they can be put represent an effort both to regularise FIC's giving to charity and also to involve shoppers in deciding how the company's charity budget should be allocated.

Independent of any long-standing and substantial charitable commitments that the FIC might have,

which remain unchanged, Eva explained that the Company has a budget of £500 per month for smaller donations and this will now be divided each month between three nominated charities, each of which will have its own box for tokens. At the end of the month, the £500 will be allocated on the basis of each charity's proportion of the weight of the total number of tokens placed in the three boxes.

Applying this method to the tokens received since the scheme began, on Wednesday the Stephen Jaffray Memorial trust received £295, the Lighthouse Seamens' Mission received £115 and the Cathedral £90.

This month's charities are Cancer Support, Acorns and The Shack. Charities wishing to be included in the scheme in future should contact Ana Crowie, Tara Francis or Eva Jaffray at the FIC, whether seeking general support or support for specific functions or events.

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
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(Left) The original Argentine poster which provoked Ron's effort and (Right) the version which mysteriously appeared in its place

Waging psychological warfare in '82 with PWD's photocopier

"WHEN you wake up in the morning, shake your head and it falls off your shoulders, you'll know you have been attacked in the night by the Ghurkhas."

This was one typical bit of folk-wisdom being offered in 1982 to the already jittery conscripts who made up the majority of the Argentine forces by Islanders like the late Malcolm Binne, who were fluent in the language of the invader.

The military call this kind of morale-sapping psychological warfare Psyops.

Head of the government's Plant and Transport Authority (PATA) in 1982 was Ron Buckett, who recently recalled to Penguin News how he also became involved in Psyops.

As chief of PATA, Ron was in charge of the PWD's only functioning photocopier, which was much used by the Argentine military.

While he was not permitted to see most of the material being copied, under the supervision always of an armed guard, a crude poster made on the copier for the Secretaria Obras Publicas (Public Works Department) did remain in his office.

Displayed in other places round Stanley the poster appeals to Argentines' fanatical love of soccer while aiming to counter their equally strong tendency to litter.

Under the slogan "Mantenga limpia Malvinas" (Keep the Falklands clean) the poster shows a soldier deftly back-heeling a piece of rubbish into a nearby bin under the watchful eye of a military policeman.

Just for his own amusement Ron sketched a similar poster, this time under the heading Falkland Islands Government with the slogan "Clean up Stanley Campaign."

Ron's version shows a nonchalant Islander in boiler suit and hob-

ble hat, having back-heeled an Argentine soldier to a member of the Task Force, who equally neatly kicks him head-first into a bin marked Argentina.

Ron's then wife, Nidge, was a formidable lady who had bullied the Argentine authorities into letting her ignore the nightly curfew in order to visit the old and vulnerable of Stanley and check on their well being.

When Ron showed this poster to Nidge, she urged him to make more copies and said that she and her social worker assistant Suzy Packer would see that they went up around the town.

Ron thinks he may have made "a dozen or so" copies of this morale-boosting little poster, which, as Nidge had promised, began to appear around Stanley to the amusement of the locals and, no doubt, the annoyance of the invaders.

At one time it seemed that the British Forces were also involved in the use of leaflets, at least according to the World Service of the BBC.

During the 74 days of Argentine occupation in 1982, the BBC was often the only source of reliable information about what was going on, especially for the Stanley residents who were forced by the curfew to remain home at night and were discouraged by bombard-

ments and a heavy military presence on the streets from venturing out much during the day.

When during the latter stages of the recovery of the Falklands in 1982, the BBC announced that the Argentine defensive lines had been showered from the air with leaflets offering safe passage home to all who surrendered, this tended to be believed, despite the fact that none of these leaflets were seen at the time and none were found on

the persons of the Argentine forces after they surrendered.

The writer recalls the non-appearance of the Safe Conduct Passes being used at the time by two Argentine officers with whom he was having a discussion as a proof that the BBC could not be trusted. They

would very much like to have one they said and had looked every where for them in vain.

Governor Rex Hunt, who had recently returned to the Islands as Civil Commissioner sent this communication from Government House in Stanley, among other papers recently released by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office. Dated August 9, 1982 it reads in part,

"The Civil Commissioner well remembers being involved in the preparation of the leaflets but, oddly enough, we haven't been able to find a single leaflet nor do

any of those who were here throughout the occupation remember seeing any."

Following this enquiry from Government House, the Ministry of Defence explained to the FCO that three leaflets were carried with the Task Force and were available for dropping over the Islands.

At the time publicity had been given to two of the leaflets, a Safe Conduct Pass and a leaflet showing the Argentine surrender at South Georgia.

The Safe Conduct pass was written in both Spanish and English and signed by Admiral Sandy Woodward the Commander of the British Task Force. It was addressed to British Forces and read,


"The soldier who bears this pass has signalled his desire to cease fighting. He is to be treated strictly in accordance with the Geneva Convention and is to be evacuated from the area of operations as soon as possible. He is to be given food and medical treatment if he requires it and then be held in a place of shelter to await repatriation."

The reverse side of this leaflet carried a letter addressed to Brigadier General Menendez, the Commander in Chief of the Argentine forces urging him to consider the wisdom of surrendering in the interests of saving further loss of life.

The mystery of the missing leaflets was solved when in October 1982, the FCO responded to a further enquiry by Rex Hunt about the leaflets and admitted:

"The Ministry of Defence are rather sensitive about these leaflets because after having been assured by CINCFLEET that they had indeed been dropped, they publicly announced the fact. They later discovered that none had in fact been dropped - the rapidity of the final phases of the campaign made them unnecessary."

Top gun shearer Evan smashes Islands record

ISLANDER Evan Jones smashed the Falkland Islands sheep shearing record by five sheep on Monday when he shored 461 full fleeced mature ewes at North Arm.

The previous record holder was Peter McKay also a Falkland Islander, who 15 years ago in the Port Howard shed on West Falkland shored 456 ewes. It was a long time to hold on to a top tally in the shearing world but Peter told Penguin News he was happy to see it go to Evan. "I always wanted someone local to get it and I've got loads of praise for him," he said.

But Peter does not think the record will remain static for such a long time again. "I'm sure Evan himself or one of the other young shearers will probably better it again in the not too distant future," the veteran shearer said.

There are few employments left in the world that require such energy and dedication as sheep shearing. You can be as strong and as fit as is humanly possible, but a top shearer also has to have a huge heart and total commitment to physically and mentally push themselves to the limit for a full eight hours.

26 year old Evan has been shearing for seven years and on Monday morning he had a feeling it was a day to do "something big."

Although he had wanted to beat the top tally for some time he said it wasn't uppermost in his mind, but after the first 15 minutes of the day he started to push for it. North Arm's Assistant Manager Stevie Dickson had told him the sheep were good and getting better and Evan mentally prepared himself for a big day.

But at breakfast time, morning smoko and lunch time he was a few sheep short of the required quota to break the 456 record and as he picked up his hand piece in

the afternoon he needed to shear one sheep per minute for two and a quarter hours to beat the record by one sheep.

Incredibly, Evan shifted up another gear in the last spell and for the final 45 minutes in the eight hour day a shorn sheep slipped into the letting go pen every 57 seconds, until the record was not only equalled, but beaten by five sheep.

"I was completely drained, but so happy," Evan told the Penguin News.

"The next day was a slow one and I'm still recovering now," he said on Wednesday.

North Arm's manager Ian Jaffray sets a high standard on the shearing board and many a shearer trying to slip a shoddy job past him has had the error of his ways pointed out – it's what the shearers call "a bombing" and in his younger days Evan had been on the receiving end of a few.

"Ian was more excited than I was on the last run, he kept nipping up to see the tally on my counter," said Evan.

"I kept wondering if I was going to get bombed out, but I reckon he's getting soft in his old age as he even bought me a case of beer," joked an elated Evan.

But there is no chance of Ian going soft just yet. "It was a good quality job and I wouldn't settle for anything else. I guess the bombings have paid off over the years, well done to Evan," he told the Penguin News.

On the same day five other local lads worked alongside Evan to shear a total of 1,816 sheep. Joe Clarke and Lucas Berntsen achieved personal bests of 350 and 323 while Scott Short clocked up 190 in his first season and Daniel Ford and Roy McKay shored 274 and 218 respectively.

Stanley rises to the challenge

THE old Sunday newspaper banner boast, "All human life is here" crossed my mind on Wednesday every time I lifted my head to observe some of the estimated 5000 cruise ship passengers passing the office window. I didn't see anyone I could definitely identify as a tribesman from the mountains of Papua New Guinea, but it seemed that almost every other nationality in the world was represented.

What I also didn't see, and felt quite glad about not seeing, was anyone holding the letter that Councillor Sharon Halford mentioned during her round-up of last week's ExCo meeting. According to Cllr Halford, "Approval was given for a letter which has been prepared and can be handed out to people visiting the Falklands. This welcomes the visitor and gives a few pointers on how to behave whilst here."

Although I have not seen a copy, I doubt if the letter is like the excellent and informative leaflet prepared by the Tourist Board for Wednesday's visitors, which gave very clear information about opening times, authorised tour guides and their availability, acceptable forms of payment etc.

You could give such a letter to any visitor and they would be grateful, I am sure. What I am not so sure about is how a warning about correct behaviour would be received. I know how I would react if I got off a plane in Australia and was handed a leaflet saying, "Don't mention the Ashes" or landed in Iran to be advised, "Don't mention the Axis of Evil."

People who are out to cause trouble, will cause trouble, wherever they are and whenever they can. Warning them will have little effect and though I may be wrong I think such a 'welcoming but warning' letter could even be taken as an invitation by potential trouble makers, as it makes us out to be rather pathetically sensitive, as well as maybe over-ready to take offence, where none might be intended.

Assuming that the Government's advice is aimed primarily at those visitors who might want to wave foreign flags or mis-name our geography, selecting who to give it to solely on the basis of their appearance could go seriously wrong and seriously offend. It would also quite probably be illegal, which may be why - according to rumour - it has been returned to the Attorney General's Chambers for checking.

The presence of 5000 people on our shores gives us a fantastic opportunity for positive public relations. Rather than risking upsetting visitors needlessly, how marvelous it would have been if Government had followed the example of a growing number of private tour operators and provided every visitor with a copy of Pepper and Pascoe's excellent and well-researched historical booklet, "Getting it Right - the Real History of the Falklands/Malvinas."

Wool exports tied up with red tape

SHEEP farmers who ship wool on MoD vessels could have to change the packing from the current 180 kg (average) bales to 50 kg bales if a dangerous goods issue recently highlighted by workers at Mare Harbour is not permanently resolved.

FIG Marine Officer Malcolm Jamieson said some of the problems experienced were because the International Maritime Dangerous Goods Code (IMDG Code) lacked clarity.

Wet wool is listed within the Code as dangerous goods, so therefore it would be natural to assume that dry wool would be considered a safe cargo. For most shipping lines this is the case.

Local shipping company SAAS have never been asked for any declaration in connection with shipping wool and are happy to ship bales of dry wool in the current bale sizes, General Manager Stewart Lawton, told the Penguin News on Thursday "Our service provider Hamburg Sud is very proactive about hazardous cargo and has no problem with the way the wool is being shipped."

Mr Jamieson explained however that on closer inspection, wool could also be classed as an oily animal fibre. Whether wet or oily wool there is a possibility it could spontaneously combust hence the 'dangerous' classification.

"Dangerous goods are shipped around the world every day of the year but there are limits regarding the size of the containers that they are shipped in to minimise the dangers. With wool, the IMDG Code specifies that it should be carried in 50kg bags and not 180kg which is the norm in the Falklands and possibly elsewhere," said Mr Jamieson.

Where it is not possible for whatever reason to carry dangerous goods exactly as required by the IMDG Code, the UK Maritime

and Coastguard Agency, as a Competent Authority under the IMDG Code, can issue an approval on individual cases such as the recent dilemma faced with shipping wool from the Falklands.

Personnel at Mare Harbour had identified that wool being shipped from the Falklands was not complying with existing IMO regulations. "All shipping operators and exporters - whether civilian or MoD - must operate in accordance with these regulations" said a military spokesman.

"In this case, concerns were raised with both the consignor and the shipping agent that the recent cargo appeared to contravene IMDG regulations," he said, adding that for future shipments, the wool would have to be packed and labelled in accordance with IMDG regulations, unless the consignor and shipping agent secure a further MCA exemption.

"The responsibility for declaring, packaging and labelling wool correctly for shipping lies with the commercial companies acting as the consignor and shipping agent for the exported product. The responsibility for ensuring that the ship is loaded in accordance with IMDG regulations lies with Mare Harbour personnel, who must comply with the law" said the military spokesman.

He added, "Overall, BFSAI understands completely the concern of farmers and potential impact on the local economy - and will advise and assist wherever possible - but we must operate within extant international shipping regulations."

Mr Jamieson said approvals or exemptions were looked at on a case by case basis and concluded: "As an interim measure, the approval being issued will be for the next voyage only and a longer term solution will be looked into well in advance instead of the short deadline last week."

In court this week

ROBERT Crowie (52), of Stanley, admitted this Wednesday to driving whilst under the influence of alcohol on December 9. He explained through his defence counsel Mr Keith Watson that it was a case of an expensive two or three drinks and a serious error of judgement on his part.

Mr Trevaskis gave Mr Crowie maximum credit for an early admission of guilt and previous good character but disqualified him from driving for 18 months and ordered him to pay a fine and costs totalling £585.

Steven Toolan (44), of Stanley, admitted on Wednesday to causing criminal damage to windows and the gate of the Shackleton Drive YMCA building on 25 November last year. Given that he has already covered the costs of repairing the damage and his previous good character, Mr Toolan was conditionally discharged by Senior Magistrate Mr Trevaskis and ordered to pay prosecution costs of £85.

The sentencing and trial of Claudio Briones Sepulveda (48), were adjourned by the court until February 10. Senior Magistrate Mr Trevaskis acknowledged that the case seemed to be growing all the time, referring to a fresh charge of assault from September last year which has been brought and denied by the accused.

Mr Sepulveda is due to be sentenced for two admitted charges of assault and subsequent bail and conditional discharge breaches. He is also awaiting trial for the three charges he denies.

Due to staffing shortages in the the Magistrates Court, a trial date will not be set until after mid March, at which time the Senior Magistrate anticipated that sentencing for the charges to which Mr Sepulveda has already pleaded guilty would also take place.



Frequent visitor to the Falkland Islands, the MV Polar Star

Falkland Islands visitor finds an Antarctic rock

THE expedition cruise ship MV Polar Star, which was one of the first to visit the Falkland Islands this season, sustained what was described as minor damage on Tuesday morning when it struck a rock at Detaille Island off the Arrowsmith Peninsula in Antarctica, while preparing to anchor.

The ship left Ushuaia, Argentina, on January 26 for a 10 day adventure with 80 passengers and 35 crew on board.

The passengers who include Canadian, American, British, Australian and Dutch citizens were reported uninjured.

Early assessment of the damage suggested that the vessel's outer hull had been punctured, but not its inner hull.

Martin Karlsen, President of Polar Star Expeditions, stated that the double-hulled vessel travelled uneventfully and at normal cruising speed from Detaille Island to the Polish Aretowski Station on King George Island, where station divers assessed the damage to the outer hull.

Following the underwater

inspection of the MV Polar Star's outer hull, the decision was taken to disembark the ship's 80 passengers at King George Island in the South Shetland Islands as a precautionary measure before crossing the Drake Passage and returning to Ushuaia, Argentina.

Alternative transportation back to Ushuaia is being arranged for MV Polar Star's passengers.

Following discussions with the captain and officials of Det Norske Veritas, the MV Polar Star's classification society, the company made the precautionary decision not to cross the Drake Passage with passengers aboard.

Once passengers have been transferred and temporary repairs made, the ship will proceed to Ushuaia with its 35 officers and crew.

Polar Star Expeditions has announced that the Polar Star's February Antarctica cruise will be cancelled, but the vessel's local agents Sullivan Shipping could not confirm whether this will affect a scheduled Falklands visit in mid March.

Inspired Hart

RISING comedy star Miranda Hart cleaned up with three gongs at the Comedy Awards. Unexpected was the dramatic untold story of nearly losing her inspiring father Captain David Hart-Dyke who was commanding officer of Royal Navy destroyer HMS Coventry when it was sunk by the Argentinians, with 19 men killed.

Dwarf for sale

THE FALKLANDS and the "Dwarf" a fascinating account of the voyage of the 1881-2 visit of the ship Dwarf to the Falklands by Rear Admiral Kit Layman and Jane Cameron has been reprinted and is on sale at The Capstan, Museum and the Pink Shop. Proceeds from this new printing will be donated directly to the Alastair and Jane Cameron Memorial Trust in Stanley.

Navy Rum

KELVIN McCallum bought a bottle of Navy rum as he travelled to the Falklands on the HMS Glamorgan. The 27 year old was killed alongside 12 comrades by an Argentine Exocet that struck the ship. The bottle is to be toasted in their honour on February 15 at the new Hookers Point stone memorial that marks where the missile was launched from in 1982.

Oils well

DESIRE Petroleum has announced its next well to be the Ninky prospect when a rig becomes available again in either March or April. Rockhopper Explorations Ocean Guardian semi-submersible is operating on an appraisal well at the Sea Lion discovery, after that programme the rig is going back to Desire.

Tight and Talk?

ABERDEEN based oilfield equipment specialist Titan Torque Services has secured a six-figure one-year contract to provide torquing facilities in support of the operation of the drilling rig Ocean Guardian off the Falklands.

Next Assembly

THE NEXT session of Legislative Assembly has been scheduled to take place at 9.30m on Friday February 25, in the Court and Council Chambers, Town Hall.

70 years SAR

THE stamp issue release of the 70th anniversary of the RAF Search and Rescue has been postponed from February 4 to 16.

Poor start to Falklands Illex season

VESSELS fishing for the squid species *Illex argentinus* in Falklands waters have been reporting poor catches of around two and five ton per day so far this season, confirmed Falkland Islands Fisheries Scientist Dr Alexander Arkhipkin.

The low catches are a disappointment after the 2010 season when catches returned to a more normal level after a poor season the year before.

Dr Arkhipkin said, "Our analysis of the oceanographic situation on the High Sea in January 2011 shows that the Falkland Current is less intensified. It has also shifted offshore and therefore does not create strong hydrological frontal zones between warm shelf wa-

ters (16-17C) and cold Sub-Antarctic waters of the Current.

"Illex tends to concentrate near these frontal zones in common years, which is not the case this year so far."

Dr Arkhipkin continued, "According to the data from reporting trawlers, catches of *Illex* are small, varying between two and five ton per day. About half of the catch is composed of small and immature winter-spawning squid, with the rest being larger and mature summer-spawning squid.

"Winter-spawning squid should come later to Falkland Islands zones to feed. Their abundance at the moment seems to be small. However, further migrations of winter-spawning squid on the

High Seas in February should tell us more about their total abundance."

Describing the Falkland Islands Government Fisheries Department programme of research activity planned for next month, Dr Arkhipkin said that the new research cruise would be done on Castelo, with the main aim to assess the total abundance of one of the most important commercial stocks - rock cod.

Another survey is planned on Venturer with the main goal to estimate the number of *Loligo* recruits for the next fishing season that will start on 24 February 2011. Ten scientists from the Department will participate in both surveys.

MP

January weather

JANUARY 2011 had slightly above average temperatures, was drier than normal and slightly less sunny. It also had the second highest fog days for January since MPA records began in 1986.

Temperature

The mean maximum temperature was 16.2 Celsius compared with an average for January of 15.3 Celsius. The highest temperature recorded was 22.1 Celsius on the 6th and the lowest maximum was 8.4 Celsius on the 17th.

The mean minimum temperature was 7.3 Celsius, compared with the 6.6 Celsius January average. The lowest minimum was 2.8 Celsius on the 14th and the highest minimum was 12.5 Celsius recorded on the 4th.

Rainfall

The total rainfall for the month was 39.5mm, compared with the January average of 60.6mm. The wettest day was on the 27th with a total of 9.8mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 17 days and 1.0 mm or more fell on 10 days.

Sunshine

There were 223.9 hours of sunshine, compared with the monthly average of 227.8 hours. The highest daily total was 15.7 hours on the 5th.

Snow/Hail/Thunder/Fog

There were 4 days when fog occurred in January, which is the second highest since records began. There were 2 days with hail and no days with thunder, snow or sleet.

Wind/Gales

The monthly mean wind speed was 15.1 knots, which compares to a January average of 15.4 knots. The highest hourly mean speed of 40 knots occurred on the 4th January and the highest recorded gust of 55 knots was also recorded on the 4th. Gales occurred on 3 days. There were 20 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots.

The Post Office received approval to pursue a partnership agreement with MoneyGram International to introduce an additional service for customers which would allow them to transfer money from within the Post Office.

Communications

The Telecommunications (Amendment) Bill 2011 was given approval to be gazetted and allow time for consultation before it goes to Legislative Assembly in May.

Container Park

Additional funding of £335,000 was approved for works needed to complete the container park near FIPASS. This will bring the total of this project to £1,320,200.

Ferry Terminal

Additional funding of £185,000 was also requested and approved to finish works on the Port Howard Ferry Terminal which will bring the cost of this project to £1,270,940.

Sea Lion status

The designation of Sea Lion Island as a National Nature Reserve and the Management Plan thereof was agreed in principle and legislation will now need to be drawn up to achieve this.

Immigration

The Immigration (Amendment) Bill 2011 was approved for publication and subsequent submission to Legislative Assembly.

New stamps in S. Georgia

SOME time in mid-March the South Georgia Fishery Patrol Vessel Pharos SG will carry to the island this set of stamps commemorating Sir Alister Clavering Hardy (1896-1985) the eminent marine biologist famous for his work on plankton and fisheries, but also an accomplished artist, inventor and writer of popular science.

From March, for the first time, Pharos SG will also be deploying Hardy's creation the Continuous Plankton Recorder on its voyages to and from South Georgia.



Standard Chartered Bank in Stanley welcomes new Chief Executive

STANDARD Chartered Bank Falkland Islands has recently appointed a new Chief Executive Officer.

Binoy Karia takes over from Rino Donosepoetro, better known as Donny, who has moved to a new role based in Singapore as Standard Chartered's Regional Head of Audit, Governance for South East Asia.

Mr Karia joined Standard Chartered in 2006 from Allen & Overy where he qualified as a solicitor and held senior roles in general banking and syndicated lending. His career at Standard Chartered began as legal counsel to Wholesale Banking on issues ranging from syndicated lending and acquisition finance.

Mr Karia was a leading advisor to Standard Chartered Bank during

the recent global financial crisis. In 2008 he assumed the role as Head of Lending, Wholesale Banking Legal and was previously based in London.

Binoy's appointment as CEO in the Islands took effect from January 1. His wife, Purvi, will be joining him later in the year following the delivery of their first child, due in March.

A VERY special tea was served at Government House on January 7 2011, when the Governor, Mr Hayward presented Duke of Edinburgh Award Certificates and Badges to Sonia Arkhipkina of Stanley.

Over the past three years Sonia has completed both the Bronze Award and the Silver Award. When the rest of her group received their Bronze Awards Sonia was not in the Islands, so the presentation was delayed.

The Governor very kindly held afternoon tea at Government house and made the presentations in the presence of committee members and instructors of the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme and Sonia's family.

The Governor commented how pleased he was to see that the Award Scheme was active in the Falklands.

The Chairman, Mr Ken Newton, said that Sonia's efforts were exemplary, and that she was a true

Not Catch-22 says councillor

I REFER to the front page article in Penguin News of the 28th January entitled "New born baby in catch-22 trap."

A catch 22 trap is as you describe it, ie "a situation where rules are contradictory and impossible to comply with." In the circumstances that you detail, the rules are very clear and, frustrating as it may be, are relatively simple to comply with - something which in fact your article explains later on. I confess therefore that I do not understand the banner headline.

The Borquez family have not been disadvantaged by the 2009 Constitution. They would have been in the same circumstances under the old Constitution.

In common with many other countries, being born in the Falkland Islands to parents who are foreign nationals and temporarily resident here does not confer Falkland Island status or British citizenship on the child. Most countries have similar rules.

This had been patiently explained to Mr Borquez in both English and Spanish before the child was born. It had also been clearly explained that the correct documentation needed to be obtained from the Chilean authorities for the child, in order to allow the child to travel with either or both parents.

LAN seems to be the target in your article also regarding the strict rules regarding identity documents for the child. These rules, which LAN is obliged to follow, are set by the Chilean government and not LAN. The reasons for this are to protect children. Whilst a Chilean national may enter Chile without a passport, passengers will be fingerprinted on entry and their nationality verified by International police. This is clearly not possible in the case of a baby which is why identity documents have to be obtained in advance.

Mr Borquez has been given the same advice and assistance as would any other person in the same circumstances. The advice given was the same before the child was born and has been the same ever since. However, he has only just now completed the documentation to apply for an identity document for his child - it was dispatched last weekend by the quickest means possible that we could find for him. He is very firmly in the hands of the speed of the Chilean embassy in London and how fast they can deal with his request once they have received the documentation.

Interestingly, a child born in the Falkland Islands who is a British

citizen at birth has to obtain a full British passport from the UK Passport Agency in order to be able to travel. This process can take up to ten weeks.

All of the people who have dealt with Mr Borquez's repeated requests have given him the same consistent advice. His attitude towards some of them has at times been sadly lacking in both respect and politeness. What we will not be doing is contemplating any changes to the Constitution to accommodate his requests.

This resulted in a hasty plane flight at over eight months pregnant when we were suddenly told that we would have to pay all medical bills for the coming child, plus the emergency aircraft to South America if needed.

If we had stayed to have the child then the similarities would have been apparent.

With no apparent legislation to have the child put on my passport as a father - which seemed ludicrous - and Maria being Argentine (no Consul up the road there either ...) we were given written permission by the then Governor to leave with no travel documents.

No status then, no documents, no problem - hence the similarities.

Perhaps it's comforting to know that the new constitution is as much an ass as the previous one, though in my opinion all obstacles can be overcome if the intellectual capacity exists with those given the job of implementing it.

I have my permission from the Governor framed on my studio wall. To quote the 10cc song 'It hides a nasty stain that's lying there...'

The long saga of the fire engine

I WOULD be grateful for the possibility to reply to the article in last weeks Penguin News with regard to the airport fire appliance. If I have inadvertently misled or misrepresented the situation then I must apologise. The saga has been a long and rather hideous one. I hope the following will help elucidate the situation.

It was decided back in 2007/8 that the existing airport fire appliance had passed its "best before" date and would not meet the new Overseas Territories Aviation Requirements and a decision was made to purchase a new Category 2 (Cat2) unit (the Firefox) plus another second hand refurbished unit to replace the Fire Services aging Bedford appliance.

The Cat2 was to provide fire cover for FIGAS aircraft only. At no time during the purchase of the Cat2 was BAS a consideration as the then EXCO decided that all other flights which require a higher grade of fire cover such as the Dash 7 would have to use MPA.

It was later decided that in order for Helicopters to use Stanley Airport a higher specification of appliance than that originally ordered was required. The Chief Fire Officer embarked upon a redesign of the Firefox Cat2 in order to allow this to happen.

After the realisation that the loss of the Dash 7 was having a very marked effect on the local economy, the Chief Fire Officer was tasked to do everything possible to get BAS Back. This required a redesign of the second unit as much as possible to raise its capabilities and capacities. One of the challenges faced by the Chief Fire Officer was that this had to be achieved within the £230K previously allocated.

When the Firefox Cat2 appliance arrived it was found that it was carrying a design defect and other minor issues. An engineer from the company was flown down (at no expense to the Falklands) arriving here on the 4th of December and both he and the Chief Fire Officer worked from that Saturday afternoon until Thursday (including a public holiday) to rectify the problem and it was duly handed over (and accepted) by the Airport General manager on the 10th of December.

The second unit is now nearing completion.

I understand that although it is not a Cat5 rated vehicle in its own right, which is the fire category of the BAS Dash 7, it has been designed with maximum capacities and flexibilities to provide a multi roll (Domestic & Aviation) appliance.

FIG and BAS have carried out considerable work to produce a safety case for the combined use of the new Cat2 and domestic appliances at Stanley Airport. This safety case, when approved, will demonstrate known risks and an appropriate level of mitigation.

When both vehicles are in service the final approval of the safety case will be to demonstrate to the local regulator the capability of the appliances in accordance with the methods described within the safety case. When this has taken place BAS can make use of Stanley Airport with the Dash 7 aircraft.

I would also like to take the opportunity to counter a couple of rumours that have been doing the rounds to the effect that Gardner is zooming up and down the Atlantic on jollies, at great expense to the taxpayer, looking at his fire engines.

After the first unit arrived here in a less than acceptable condition he was dispatched North to liaise with the company that is doing the refurbishment on the second unit to give it the once-over to make sure that all that we wish is being incorporated.

On that occasion FIG did pay for his flights but Gardner paid for his own accommodation and transport costs. He also undertook training at Draeger and also paid for Bulk Fuel Storage Tank Firefighter training himself.

As Gardener has told me, the situation with the second unit has become a personal matter to him and he will be returning to the UK to make sure that the vehicle is fully up to the standard that he expects. To do this he is taking annual leave and paying for the flights, accommodation and all other expenses himself. I don't think we can ask for much more than that.

If all goes according to plan the second unit will be here on the 16th of April.

This week PN Founding Editor Graham Bound enjoys a pleasant meeting with a forceful fellow representative of Britain's old empire, just as the World Service of the BBC seems to be giving up on it.....

RIP BBC World Service

I DO not believe it is an exaggeration to say that, in the latter half of the 20th Century and the early part of this century, a single British radio station made life in the Falklands sustainable. The BBC World Service, for which I worked for some years, kept us in touch with what was going on across the globe and when we became the news in 1982, those of us in Stanley tuned in to it to find out what was happening in our own islands.

People visiting the Falklands would comment that they had not expected to come to one of the most remote places on earth to find people who knew more about international politics than they did.

That high level of awareness was thanks to the World Service, which we listened to every day. Perhaps we did so because we had no TV.

Radio Newsreel and News About Britain were entertainment, and relayed faithfully by FIBS when local radio was so much more than a top-40 station (the way it describes itself today).

The rot set into World Service some years ago. Strangely, the government in Stanley conspired with London and the BBC itself conspired to silence the World Service programme that was created especially for the Falklands. Yes, there really was one – and not that long ago.

Then the short wave transmissions became fewer; the arts and culture element of World Service was largely sacrificed for rolling news and the station's British cachet became less obvious. I do not even know if the "bongs" of Big Ben are broadcast these days. Probably not.

So it was not very surprising when the Government in London announced that a huge chunk of funding would be withdrawn from its flag carrying radio station. The result is that 600-plus jobs at Bush House will go, as will language services and some of the few remaining fine English language programmes, such as Outlook.

I presented Outlook from time to time ten years or so ago. I loved it; especially when we had Pakistani bands performing live in the studio or Vietnamese cooks whipping up fish dishes on the mixing desk. I don't know if I did such broadcast events full credit, but it was a remarkable experience. I still have friends who work on Outlook, and they are now staring at redundancy.

Millions of listeners around the world must be dumb-founded.

The World Service was a great ambassador for Britain; arguably our most respected and influential export. It did not concentrate uniquely on things British, and therefore demonstrated that post-colonial Britain fostered equality and mutual respect between countries.

Now, The Voice of America is the dominant world radio broadcaster and the Chinese, and Russians will be planning to scoop up the listeners Britain has abandoned.

So, farewell World Service. You've got the skids under you. They slashed your budget knowing that only people outside Britain's borders would really mourn and such people do not matter because they do not vote in British elections.

Some Falkland Islanders will mourn. When their only listening option is a banal mix of pop and inane chatter, they will remember the days when they could tune into a station that was informative, entertaining, sustaining and loyal.

Let's hope we do not face another crisis. In a re-run of 1982, (and these days, who would say that is an absurd thought?) local radio and the internet would be the first to go. With no World Service, we would feel truly alone.

Sikh and find

I accidentally drove into Southall, London's Indian suburb, recently. There was a Sikh festival going on, and consequently traffic was just crawling. As the car idled in a jam, I heard a knocking on the window. It was a little Indian lady indicating that I should wind down the window so she could talk to me.

I did so, and she beamed a smile. Was I going anywhere near the Sikh temple, which was apparently nearby? I had no idea. "Never mind," she said. "I'll show you the way." Before I could say I didn't need to know where the temple was because I wasn't go-

ing there, she was in, settled in the front seat and buckling up.

Two other Sikh ladies knocked on the rear windows and politely gestured that I should take them too. "Never mind about them," said my lady. She turned around, gave them a sweet smile and wagged her finger, as if to say, "I got here first, and he's mine."

As we inched off, she introduced herself to me as Jenny, "that's what my English friends call me." She firmly but pleasantly issued directions, and we navigated through the crowds and into the depths of this remarkable suburb. I was slightly put out at first. Whose car was this? But I quickly began to enjoy the unexpected company.

Jenny talked at me, mostly about her son who was a dentist and her daughter who had married a doctor and the trials and tribulations her family had faced since they arrived in the UK in the early 1970s.

The rhythm of her chatter was pleasant. But suddenly she broke off mid-train. "Stop!" she ordered. I am going to get us some food."

I obeyed orders, and Jenny was out of the car in a flash and engaging with a small crowd of fellow Sikhs on the roadside. I could see her gesturing at me, and the other sari-clad ladies leaned down to look at me and smile. No money changed hands, and Jenny was soon back in the car with plastic plates of rice and vegetables. We tucked in, and then drove on.

Ten minutes later, I was again ordered to stop. On this day Sikhs exemplify generosity, passing out food to anyone who is hungry or thirsty. Again, ladies from a roadside kitchen bent down to wave and smile at me, and Jenny accepted cups of a sweet yoghurt drink and plates of cake loaded with syrup and pistachio nuts.

We tucked in again, and she listened politely to my stories for a few minutes before becoming clearly bored and reverting to tales about her grandchildren, who were studying for A-levels and planning to become doctors and dentists. Or marry them.

Eventually this diminutive but authoritative lady told me to turn sharply left, negotiate my way around several buses full of Sikhs and then drop her at the imposing building which was her temple.

Jenny thanked me profusely, told me how to reach the nearby M25 and left the car. I leaned over and said, "But how are you going to get home?"

"Oh, don't worry about me, dear. I'll get a lift home." She waved again, smiled and was gone. I had no doubt at all that she would get a lift home, probably with someone who was not planning to go anywhere near her house in Southall. Afterwards, that person would, like me, be slightly stunned but strangely happy.

Wine & working together

THE forty or so guests who took up an invitation to attend a wine-tasting at Government House on Thursday evening were met by the unusual sight of the normally nattily-dressed Governor, Mr Nigel Haywood, in shirt sleeves.

While such informality would normally seem unusual – and clearly was regarded as such by the number of male guests who came best be-suited – the occasion was also somewhat unusual and not the usual cocktail party or reception, where a certain standard of elegance is expected from the ladies and at least the formality of jacket and tie from the men.

As the Governor explained to his guests, this was an evening with a purpose. There had been, he explained, some critical comment about the quality of the wine normally served at Government House. The two-fold purpose of the evening was to find out firstly whether guests at Government House were capable of telling the difference between different kinds and qualities of wine and, secondly, the kind of wine they preferred.

Given such a serious purpose, Mr Haywood emphasised, the evening could be regarded as work, hence the informality of his appearance.

Some twenty-one different wines: 12 red, 7 white and 2 rosé were on offer for tasting, identified only by number. There were none of the normal canapés, but there was a supply of dry bread and water for the purposes of palate-cleansing.

The wines were supplied for the event by Stanley Services and the Seafish Chandlery. Being asked to write names on their score card caused a certain nervousness among some representatives of those organisations in case they should inadvertently mark down their own best products on a scale ranging from 1 (This is not a good wine) to 5 (I really love this wine).

It was not compulsory to test each and every wine though many accomplished this in the two hours available.

By the end of session everybody had had an enjoyable time, though their critical faculties may have been somewhat blunted. Despite this, when the scores were totted up by Government House's Ralph Jones it emerged that the two most popular red wines had also been the most expensive at around £28 a bottle.

Governor Haywood said that popular approval would have to be tempered by financial considerations and guests should not expect to enjoy these wines at his table in the future.

Concordia Bay taking the old isolation out of islands

WHILE access by air continues to be a problem for some of the Falklands outer islands and the future of the use of sea trucks remains in doubt, Mike Rendell has sent us this story illustrating how the cross-sound ferry Concordia Bay has made a sea change at Bleaker Island.

ELEVEN years ago when two house kits arrived on the island, everything had to be off-loaded from MV Tamar into sea trucks, which then came ashore on the beach near the settlement and with the invaluable help of a military patrol (fortuitously visiting at the

time) was laboriously manhandled on to the foreshore.

The whole lot (we are talking roof joists right through to kitchen sinks here) was then shifted 500 metres by tractor and trailer to the settlement.

Sadly, no pictorial record was kept of the house-kits being unloaded.

Somewhat ironically, six months later the first occupants of the newly constructed Cobb's Cottage were the Morrison Jetty Gang who came to build a Seatruck ramp for the island.

Last November, with the arrival of another house-kit, a

similar logistical exercise was repeated, but using different delivery methods made possible due to the configuration of MV Concordia Bay and to the epic construction of Bleaker Island Ocean Terminal by Robert Short.

After lengthy deliberations it was deemed feasible to ship the three 40 foot containers containing the house-kit directly from Marchwood to Bleaker Island, transshipping at FIPASS. This time photographs were taken.

The first two containers were off-loaded at the newly opened Bleaker Island Ocean Terminal on 8 November, between 04.39 and

04.52 (just 13 minutes) whilst the third container arrived on 23 November.

After all this, on 25 January, it was relatively simple to bring in a further 20 ft container containing the kitchen sink, amongst other things. This time the Workboat Services side loader was utilised, another first for Bleaker Island Ocean Terminal.

Sincere thanks are due to Robert Short, Workboat Services, Neil McKay, Fortuna Ltd, Myles Lee and South Atlantic Trading in particular. None of this would have been possible without their goodwill and perseverance.

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Boules for Bens?

A GAME normally associated with France, dappled sunshine through plane trees and old men in berets smoking Gaulouises has brought international success to two teams representing the Falklands this year. Perhaps the time has come for boules or petanque to take its place alongside, rifle shooting, badminton, darts, soccer and even cricket as a Falkland Islands sport.

In 1996, while visiting his dad, Don, Alistair Jacobsen of the Victory Bar in Stanley and wife Cathy played the first of what was to become an annual series of boules matches between the Falkland Islands and a team from Portland in Dorset, where Don has a summer-time chalet, over which the Falklands flag flies when he and wife Audrey are in residence.

The Falklands team won the first match 2-0 after what Don describes as a "great fun afternoon" during which "some cans were cracked open." This year Ally and Cathy were again on hand to take part and once again the Falklands triumphed, this time by 2-1.

The event trophy is a block of Portland stone, to which have been attached Falkland Islands pebbles collected by Roy Murphy from beaches around Port Howard, including Mount Rosalie where Don was shepherd in 1953.

No trophy yet exists for the other Falklands boules success though its consequences in terms of international relations may yet prove more serious. In September Penguin News Deputy Editor John Fowler and former FIG Internal Auditor, Frank Jackson accepted a challenge from Frank's neighbour Jacques and a large Frenchman of Tahitian origin, before two packed benches of ancient experts, on the sun-drenched gravel of the Petanque Club of Carcassonne in Southern France. They won two-one.

Unlike the Portland matches which play to 7 points per set, in France where such things are taken seriously, each of the three sets of this international contest consisted of the first to 13. After narrowly losing the first set, the FI fought back in the second to a 13-1 near "fanny" or whitewash, an unexpected turn of events which brought exclamations of horror, mingled with cries of "Bravo Les Isles Malouines! (Falkland Islands) "from the benches.

In the third and final set, the French rallied somewhat with the high throws of the large Tahitian "tiseur" (shooter) finding their mark and hitting the Falkland boules. The end result was in doubt until Fowler clinched victory with the last throw of the match, which snaked past the opposition to end alongside the jack or "cachonnet."

Slaking their thirst with several glasses of locally produced Muscat later in the bar of the Carcassonne Petanque Club at the expense of the losers, Fowler and Jackson readily agreed to the suggestion that this should become an annual event.

Boules is a game which could be well-suited to the Falklands being playable on a any stretch of relatively level earth, gravel or grass. Alistair Jacobsen says he has a set of the required metal spheres "in a shed somewhere" but has at the moment no plans to introduce the game at the Victory bar. What a pity! Or should that be, "Quelle dommage!"

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
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

Waterfront masterplan to be submitted to ExCo

LONG-STANDING efforts to revitalise Stanley waterfront this week edged a little closer, with news that a paper on the proposals is to be submitted to the next meeting of Executive Council.

While discussions on the regeneration of the historic dockyard and improvements to the East Jetty have been ongoing for some years, together with proposed relocation of both the Museum and the Public Works Department offices, it is only recently that a masterplan for the entirety of the waterfront has been mooted.

David Waugh, General Manager of Falkland Islands Development Corporation, told the Penguin News he believed the existing waterfront "leaves something to be desired," but it presented "a huge opportunity for both tourism and Stanley residents alike."

FIDC and PWD, as part of the FIG Major Projects Board, have been asked to bring forward a pro-

posal for a gradual development of the entire waterfront for government to consider.

Mr Waugh said such a masterplan should include early provision of improved arrival and departure of cruise ship passengers and better public facilities.

"Any such phased development would require a strong partnership between the private and public sectors," he said, adding that any development of a coherent masterplan would require extensive public consultation.

Mr Waugh, presenting an overview of FIDC activities to the FIDC board on Tuesday, said FIG was keen to see the relocation of the Museum and PWD offices as quickly and as cost-effectively as possible.

FIG and PWD are working on the proposed PWD relocation and another group is working on a plan and a programme for the proposed relocation of the Museum.

The Major Projects Board has been asked to consider incorporating the changes at the dockyard into a larger proposal for the redevelopment of Stanley waterfront, making maximum effective use of the historic dockyard area and working with the private sector to seek an attractive and welcoming waterfront, from the East Jetty to Gilbert House.

The Penguin News revealed 12 months ago that informal talks had begun on an offer from the British Antarctic Survey to supply exhibits and artefacts – "from sledges to science posters" – for a visitor centre which could help market the Falklands to tourists as the "Gateway to Antarctica."

They suggested they could provide free content for such a centre if the Falkland Islands government was able to provide an appropriate venue.

BAS Deputy Director Robert Culshaw said at the time: "We've

discussed it with several people and there is considerable interest in the idea. The existing museum has of course Antarctic content, so we've already got a beginning there. And there's no doubt a lot of your cruise passengers have an interest in the Antarctic."

A proposed outline project plan for development of the waterfront is expected to be ready for submission to Executive Council on February 24.

Museum Manager Leona Roberts told the Penguin News yesterday: "Everybody knows our plans for the dockyard and the difference it would make, not only for the Museum but for the town as a whole, and this time we are really hopeful we will see some results."

PWD Director Manfred Keenleyside said: "There is still a lot of detail being worked on, and it is at a very early stage."

It may be because the opinion makers are all still on holiday in Punte del Este that the publication of Pepper and Pascoe's excellent "Unilateral Facts" article in the Buenos Aires Herald (see opposite) seems to have caused few ripples in Argentina.

More likely it is because no amount of logic and facts about a disputed and increasingly distant history are ever going to make a difference to entrenched attitudes in what is essentially a two-sided argument about who "owns" the Falkland Islands.

For Charles Darwin, who arrived in South America on HMS Beagle, 1833 was quite an eventful year, as it was for Prudence Crandall, a white woman, arrested for founding an academy for black females in Connecticut.

In 1833 Czar Nicholas banned the public sale of serfs, John Deere made the first steel plough, Britain freed 700,000 slaves in its colonies, while a census of Curacao in the Caribbean indicated that the population consisted of 2,602 whites, 6,531 free people and 5,894 slaves. Chicago Illinois had just been incorporated as a village of around 200 souls.

Some of these events are remembered by those for whom they had consequences, but the majority are forgotten, useful only as fodder for quiz shows and as quirky reminders of how far we have come in the 178 years since 1833, when the world was very different.

Sadly for children growing up in this country in 2011, especially those whose families have lived here for generations, a disputed event in 1833, which should by now have been consigned to the dustbin of historical irrelevancy, still seems to have more impact on their future than the passage of 178 years of peaceful voluntary settlement.

Peter Pepper was disappointed at the response to his article by former Argentine Deputy Foreign Minister Andrés Cisneros. I too am disappointed by his abandonment of the position of his old boss in the Argentine Foreign Ministry, the late Dr Guido Di Tella.

Di Tella stated on record that the Islanders had to be part of any solution to the sovereignty dispute.

It maybe wasn't much, but at least it gave us the right to a voice in an argument that now seems to go on over our head, ignores our existence and gets lost in the mist of time.

Talking to an Argentine wall

THE publication in the Buenos Aires Herald of an article which first saw the light of day in the Penguin News has been described by former Falkland Islands Governor David Tatham as "a very substantial achievement".

But it seems not to have lived up to his expectation that it would provoke interest in the Spanish language press.

Internet searches by the Penguin News revealed no mention of the article's publication in either of Argentina's principal dailies, La Nación or Clarin.

Written by historians Peter Pepper and Graham Pascoe, the article in the Penguin News was entitled "Argentina's flagrant acts of absurdity and shame".

It was first republished by Mercopress under the title "Unilateral Facts," before appearing last Sunday in the Buenos Aires English language daily, along with a reply by Andres Cisneros, who

was a junior minister to Guido Di Tella in the Argentine Foreign Ministry in the 1990s.

The hope expressed by Mr Pepper to the Penguin News prior to the publication of this bilateral feature was that Cisneros might not feel obliged to defend the policies of the present Argentine Government.

However, this hope was dashed when Cisneros's article came out full of what Peter Pepper described as "time-honoured rhetoric and misinformation."

The former minister also made no reference to the jettisoned 1995 oil agreement which was signed during his period in office.

Expressing his disappointment at the refusal of Cisneros to deal adequately with the points raised in the original article, Mr Pepper concluded that perhaps this episode "illustrates more than anything else how impossible it is to argue with Argentines."

Undeniable evidence in stabbing at MPA

ALENA Dawn Scott (30) was on Wednesday found guilty of maliciously wounding her partner Delroy Leo with a kitchen knife.

In the early hours of November 20 she telephoned the emergency services at MPA, requesting an ambulance to her block and room after admitting "I've stabbed my boyfriend" to the operator.

Trial evidence was given all day on Tuesday in the Magistrate's Court after Ms Scott had entered a plea of not guilty to the charge.

She said she simply "did not know how she came to stab him," in what started as a relationship squabble and ended in her arrest.

Mr Delroy Leo sustained a 3.4cm long wound to his upper left abdomen, the direction inwards and downwards.

His voice cracked in court as his temper shortened when he was forced to relive his experience.

He admitted in an account to Police Officer Kim Bone that he

grabbed her, describing the situation as "you know, scuffle."

Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis said he was sure the defendant did wound Mr Leo based on the "unchallenged medical evidence as to the nature of the injury and through admission of the defendant" to witnesses.

The fight between the couple escalated violently when Mr Leo punched and slapped the defendant. It was determined, however, that the "degree of force used by the defendant in stabbing with a knife was out of all proportion to the actual attack upon her," Mr Trevaskis said in his closing statement.

He was also sure she knew the harm that picking up the knife could cause by the lack of any assertion on her part that she could not "foresee the consequences of thrusting a knife at the victim." Ms Scott was released on conditional bail until March 16.

Stanley Common to be next clearance target

THE next phase of minefield clearance in the Falklands will cost less, be less environmentally intrusive, but will greatly increase Stanley's recreational area. That was the message from Government House last week by the visiting scoping team headed by Richard Lindsay of the British Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

The accomplished intention of the three-man team, which also includes consultant Alistair Craib and Lt Colonel Peter Sonnex of the Ministry of Defence, was to find a site for the next phase in the process which began last year with the clearance of four areas, two in Camp and two around Stanley.

A first target for the group was the Murrell Peninsula but, after consultation with MLAs, the decision has been taken to work on the Stanley Common as an area of greater interest and more likely public use.

It is hoped that the completion of the next phase will return much of Stanley Common to public use, including giving access to the stone corral, the coastal ponds and the area known as Goose Green, all of which were popular for recreation in the days before the 1982 war.

What is planned was described by Mr Lindsay as "land relief." This basically involves pushing back the fences around areas which were designated as minefields and

might contain some unexploded ordnance, but are not expected to contain mines.

As mine-lifting is not anticipated, there will be less environmental impact on the areas searched and a reduced requirement for both personnel and funding, said Mr Lindsay, who added that resources for this phase of the project were "finite."

On the team's return to the UK an invitation to tender will be put together. Until a successful tender has been accepted it is not possible to know the nationality of the personnel involved, nor the exact technology that they will use.

Legislative Assembly Member Sharon Halford said she was delighted Stanley Common had been chosen over the Murrell Peninsula. Stanley had been growing greatly in recent years but the available recreational space for its population had not.

Show time

THE Horticultural Society's annual show will be held in the Falkland Islands Community School on Sunday February 20. The show will be open to the public from 2pm, with prizegiving at 4pm and the auction 4.30pm. Entries can be taken to FICS between 5-8pm on the day prior. Sold for scrap

THE aircraft carrier HMS Invincible is to be sold for scrap, after a Chinese businessman's £5m bid for the ship was turned down in case China put her back into service with its navy. Invincible's Sea Harrier Jump Jets played a major role in recapturing the Falklands after the 1982 invasion by Argentina. She has been laid up at Portsmouth since 2005.

Leeds new life

HMS Leeds Castle, a former patrol ship in the Falklands, has begun a new lease of life as BNS Dhaleshwari in the Bangladesh Navy. The ship was handed to Portsmouth in May last year and this month arrived at Chittagong Area Naval Command.

For auction on eBay: one Harrier Jump Jet, used, engine missing

FOR sale on eBay alongside mouse mats and badges is an ex RAF 4 Squadron Harrier Jump Jet, described as "rare" by its current owner Chris Wilson, 33, from Bradford, West Yorkshire, who promises delivery within 15 days of a cleared payment.

The jet's auction this week had attracted 79 bids from 59 interested parties. From its starting price of £69,999 it is currently selling for £94,000 with the auction due to close on Monday.

The aircraft itself was decommissioned in 1997 and saved from the scrapyard by an aircraft restoration company. Mr Wilson served as a mechanic in the RAF, and is sure it would be possible to make the Harrier airworthy.

Even though it has been stripped of its Rolls Royce engine it still has both cannon and missile storage pods.

"Without the Harrier we would never have been able to retake the Falkland Islands," the Daily Mail quoted him as saying.

In the pursuit of every boy's dream, a seven-year-old nearly

bought the Harrier when he hit the "buy it now" button while online shopping. His father quickly called the sellers, Jet Art Aviation, saying his son was not able to buy the aircraft out of his pocket money. A spokeswoman from the British company said the boy's dad profusely apologised to them.

Super yacht slips into Stanley harbour

THE Big Fish super yacht turned more than a few heads when it gracefully floated into Stanley Harbour last week.

Agent Sullivan Shipping revealed it contained ten crew members resting up before rejoining passengers in Brazil.

The 149-foot five-cabin luxury charter yacht comes complete with dining hall, Wii and granite decking.

The crew of the multi-million pound vessel last year helped out with the relief effort following the Chilean earthquake, delivering donations to the tsunami-ravaged village of Juan Bautista on Robinson Crusoe Island.

The yacht is available for charter from Aquos Yachts in Patagonia from US\$195,000 to US\$350,000 per week.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

I CONGRATULATE the Deputy Editor on his comprehensive grovelling apology of January 28 and must follow suit on behalf of MLAs this week. Answers given in good faith regarding Stanley Airport fire cover upgrade unfortunately seem to have been inadequate and possibly inaccurate. I believe that a more comprehensive answer should be available soon. I claim no expertise in that field and therefore have to rely on advice and answers from others.

ONE of the things that make an apparently sometimes thankless job rewarding is the huge variety of subjects covered in an average week. Meetings last week included one with the manager of SCB, another with the Marine Officer/Harbour Master and one with the Deputy Command Secretary from PJHQ making a welcome familiarisation visit.

THIS week began with an interesting meeting with the group investigating the possibility of more land release next summer. Two of those involved were here in the '80s with EOD so have a sound knowledge of what went before. Work continues this week so we should have information of what area clearance may be proposed shortly.

MEETINGS with visiting oil company representatives this week and last bring the committee up to date with progress thus far. It is reassuring to note the careful adherence to safety standards and increasing acceptance of the need to monitor interactions with wildlife. I believe that the proposed forum can only enhance the credibility of our regime.

A BIG concern for many of us last week was the glitch in loading wool for shipment. Thanks to a huge effort by a whole range of people the shipment left as planned, but much work needs to be done to ensure that there is no repetition of the frankly silly situation that arose.

MY previous discussion of the undesirability of multiple large cruise ship visits on the same day will be amplified and, I fear, vindicated if all arrive as scheduled on Wednesday.

IJS students sign on for a record

STUDENTS of the Infant and Junior School took part in a Guinness World Record attempt this Wednesday at precisely 11.45am local time to link up with the UK in a global effort to help spread awareness of sign language.

The school assembled in its hall to simultaneously sign the lyrics of the New Seekers '70s hit single "I'd like to teach the world to sing," under the projected instruction of Olli the Signing Monkey.

Overall 292 people at the school joined a predicted 70,000 globally for the record-breaking event organised through sign2sing.org.uk. The official result of the world record attempt will be announced when the numbers are crunched by Guinness officials.

Mrs Jane Evans, the school expert in sign language, explained how the event was monitored.

"Raffle tickets were distributed to students and adults to count the number taking part, with each 50 kids watched by an adult as they performed to ensure the count is accurate," she said.

The event was witnessed officially by Governor Nigel Haywood who, after the musical

treat, happily gave his hand to sign the letter documenting their part in the achievement.

With some time before calling lunch at 12pm to the crowd of youngsters, Mrs Steen read a story to the children explaining the im-

portant things to consider when communicating through another language, such as facial expression and eye contact. She also reminded them of the virtues of patience and compassion needed when learning a new language.

Bonners application for taxi parking is rejected

ONLY two of the seven applications for planning permission considered by the Planning and Building Committee on Friday were granted consent.

Three were for retrospective consent, the development having already been carried out, of which two were refused.

The first two of these three were submissions by Keith and Avril Bonner, for car parking areas for use by a taxi fleet, and for the change of use from domestic garage to commercial, each at premises located at 4 Felton Court where, in 2007, retrospective conditional planning permission was granted to site taxis with one condition stating that no more than three taxis would operate from the premises.

In both current cases one of the recommendations for refusal drafted by Environmental Planning Officer Antony Payne stated that the proposal was contrary to three policies of the adopted Stanley Town Plan in that it failed to safeguard the amenity of the area and had a significant adverse impact on the residential area that the proposal would generate.

Two signed petitions objecting to the applications were noted and, after much discussion, members of the committee agreed to refuse consents. The third retrospective submission, for a phone

box installed at the Museum on Holdfast Road by Cable and Wireless, was granted unconditional planning permission.

Conditional planning permission was granted in principle to Gilberto Castro for the erection of a dwelling and provision of off-street parking, with the creation of access to four existing parking spaces to be relocated, on land at the rear of 92 and 94 Davis Street fronting Eliza Crescent.

The Falkland Islands Yacht Club applied for planning permission to site a Portakabin for use as clubrooms on the north side of the mooring area at the Canache, Stanley. Members were unhappy to give approval both in view of the proposed building design and its siting, pending public consultation on the forthcoming Canache management plan. They therefore agreed to refuse permission for this development.

The remaining two submissions were both deferred: for the demolition of a garage and storage building with creation of new access to serve a new parking area at the Tax Office car park at St Mary's Walk for Stanley Services Limited (this to allow for statutory public consultation of amended plans), and Joe Newell's proposal for a single-storey dwelling and garage with off-street parking on land to the rear of 3 Villiers Street with front-

age to Davis Street (in this case for discussions to take place on the possibility of deleting the side porch to allow improved siting).

Building Adviser Nick Stephens then spoke briefly on the nine listed applications for a building permit, including a report on his visit to a site in Camp where an extension to a dwelling was proposed, and his decision that a proposed domestic storage building at 1 Fitzroy Road East was in fact an "exempt" structure which did not therefore require a permit.

Before concluding the "open" part of the meeting, members reviewed the statement prepared by the EPO following the submission of an appeal by Juanita Brock against the refusal of permission for the replacement of wooden windows with uPVC windows at 20 Drury Street. Following their agreement with what had been written, this is to be shown to Ms Brock then forwarded to Executive Council for decision.

The near-complete committee was chaired by Councillor Sharon Halford, who was supported by fellow MLA member Jan Cheek, with four of the five elected lay members attending.

The next meeting of the committee will take place on March 3 at 8.30am in the Liberation Room of the Secretariat.

Poignant day looms for HMS Glamorgan vets

HMS Glamorgan veterans and their families have begun arriving in the Falklands ahead of next week's programme of ceremonies, including the poignant dedication of a memorial monument at Hooker's Point.

The ship was hit by a deadly Exocet missile just two days before the Argentine surrender, killing 14 crew.

When the ship's former Navigating Officer, Commander Ian Inskip, visited the Falklands with his wife Marianne in 2003, they saw memorials on the Islands for all other ships lost and all units which had suffered significant casualties, except for HMS Glamorgan.

Having presented the case for a memorial to HMS Glamorgan Falklands Association Committee, about £12,000 was raised for it to be carved from Welsh granite.

Glamorgan, whose Welsh-language motto translates as "I Give Way To None," had been in the thick of fighting from the war's beginning.

She led HMS Arrow and Alacrity inshore to bombard Stanley Airport in broad daylight, designed to send a message to the enemy that the Royal Navy meant business.

On June 12 1982, when the ship strayed too close to shore, the missile body penetrated Glamorgan's hangar door, hitting a fully fuelled and fully armed Wessex III helicopter which blew apart, killing and injuring those in the hangar and galley below.

Stoker John Whitton, then aged 19 and at sea for less than a year, swam through flooded corridors to reach bilge pumps.

Still holding his breath underwater, he opened the valves allowing water in the upper levels of the Glamorgan to drain out, steadying the ship.

Mr Inskip said: "Without Taff Whitton's help there is every possibility the ship would have gone with much greater loss of life."

But Mr Whitton did not get a medal for his brave action.

Mr Inskip said: "In the confusion of the rest of the war and the subsequent euphoria at coming home it never came out exactly who did the rescue act."

"I witnessed someone swimming through the dirty, flooded corridors myself, so I knew that one of the crew was the hero."

"When I wrote a book about it later I found out from many mem-

bers of the crew that it was definitely Taff Whitton who did it, but the captain was never informed at the time."

The ship had more than 300 crew on board when the Exocet struck, but a Sea Cat anti-missile device launched by the crew failed to bring it down.

The ship was ordered to turn into the missile path in the hope it would bounce off the angled hull.

If not for that turn, the missile would have caused far more damage and the loss of life would have been "catastrophic," Mr Inskip said.

The dedication ceremony for the memorial will take place at Hookers Point at 5.30pm on Tuesday, followed by a Glamorgan and SAMA Fl reception at the FIDF Hall.

Visitors and guests will embark in HMS Clyde on Wednesday for wreath laying at sea.

Clyde crew donation to Cancer Research

HMS CLYDE'S Warrant Officer Mike French welcomed Andrew Brownlee on board last Friday morning to accept a donation of £409 to the Cancer Support and Awareness Trust.

WO French explained that he was recently appointed Charity Officer which meant organising fund raising as well as the task of choosing a charity to donate to.

Having supported the Sea Cadets and Stephen Jaffray Memorial Trust in the past, the decision to affiliate with Cancer Support and Awareness was a "personal charity, one that affects most people and indeed the crew."

A majority of the money was raised through a sponsored hypothetical "row to Rio." The crew rowed the equivalent of 3,500 km in shifts on two rowing machines on board.

Mr Brownlee expressed a "sincere and heartfelt thank you"

Dismayed to read comments

ASSI, the regulatory authority for aviation in the Islands, has received much local criticism since its introduction.

Flight safety, quite rightly, is of paramount importance, and many of the rules and regulations overseen by ASSI have been introduced as a result of countless incidents worldwide over the years.

The majority of these unfortunate events have been due to human factors, usually malpractice, error of judgment or an ignorance of the very regulations introduced to minimise the risk associated with flying operations.

I was therefore dismayed to read Cllr Cheek's comments last week that a Category 2 fire vehicle was required to satisfy operations involving the British Antarctic Survey Dash-7.

The vehicle to which she referred has a Cat 2 capability and, indeed, has a Cat 2 helicopter rating as well, so why is it that BAS can't operate from Stanley?

The reason is that her statement was inaccurate, as the Dash-7 requires more than that suggested by the learned councillor. Whether she was briefed incorrectly, probably by the DOPE (FIG acronym, not mine), or chose to comment on a subject with which she lacks

the required information, either way it demonstrated a lack of flight safety awareness and knowledge. This highlights the very reason why ASSI was introduced, to prevent flawed and perilous decision making becoming common operating procedure, which has happened in the past.

By the way, the category required is 5, which will not be satisfied by the newly purchased vehicle. This figure is taken from a very simple table, available online, which I would be willing to print off and make available to the DOPE and councillor without charging any of the consultation fees they are used to.

Support and advice is always on hand for victims of sexual abuse

Three weeks ago the Penguin News published a letter from a victim of sexual abuse. In response to the issues raised in this letter, the team at Social Services has submitted the following article...

MOST people are fortunate enough to live in a happy and safe environment.

However, some people aren't so lucky and experience abuse.

Statistics show that abuse is usually carried out by someone you know, for example a family friend or relative, although it's important to know that this is not always the case.

There are four different kinds of abuse, and these are physical, emotional, sexual and neglect.

Quite often one type of abuse overlaps with another; for example, people experiencing sexual and/or physical abuse will often also experience emotional abuse.

In layman's terms, sexual abuse is when you are forced to have sex, or someone touches you in a sexual way that makes you feel uncomfortable, or makes you touch them.

It's also when you are made to look at sexual pictures and videos,

or anything else that makes you feel uncomfortable.

Often the person carrying out the abuse will tell you to keep it a secret or make threats of what will happen if you tell.

It's important to remember that sexual abuse can happen to adults as well as children and can start at any age.

When someone is being abused they usually go through a torrent of emotions.

It is normal to feel frightened, angry, dirty, alone, guilty, unloved, ashamed and unimportant.

It's also normal to still have strong feelings for the abuser, whether it is loathing, love or a mixture of both, especially if the abuser is threatening you and making you keep it a secret or if you know the abuser.

If you are being abused, try and remember that it's not your fault. The person who has abused you is to blame.

If you or someone you know is being abused it can be very dif-

ficult deciding what to do. You may be embarrassed to talk about it or worried others won't take you seriously, but some problems just won't go away if you try to ignore them. It's OK to ask for help and you have a right to say what you think and be listened to and respected.

Everybody has a right to be

protected from harm, abuse and violence. If the abuse is something that happened weeks, months or even years ago it doesn't matter; you can still tell

someone about it and, if you wish, take it further by reporting the matter to the police.

If you tell someone about what has happened to you, it doesn't mean that you have to take the matter to police, although there are certain instances when some matters have to be investigated by professionals.

For example, if you told a professional about a historic case of child sexual abuse and the abuser still has contact with children.

In some cases, people choose not to report the matter to the police but receive support from other professionals, for example Social Services and King Edward Memorial Hospital.

In this instance the professionals may be able to help the abuse to stop, but you may need to take it further (ie to the police).

If something of this nature has happened to you and you choose to report the matter to the police it is highly likely that you will be asked to participate in a recorded video interview.

This means that you will talk about what happened to a trained professional on video.

At this point the professional will be able to talk to you about your specific circumstances and how the case may be progressed.

Remember, there are people that can help you, and you do have choices about what you do.

The latest Falklands stamps feature RAF Search and Rescue

In honour of Sea Kings

RAF Search and Rescue this year celebrates its 70th anniversary, and Pobjoy Mint has marked the occasion with a commemorative stamp release.

The RAF SAR's involvement with the Falklands began in 1982 when an RAF Sea King helicopter from 202 Squadron was deployed to Ascension Island. Although the crew did take the opportunity to medevac a casualty from the submarine HMS Spartan, their role was mainly one of support for the Task Force that was assembling at Ascension.

After the conflict three Sea King Mk 3s from C Flight 202 Squadron were deployed to the

Falklands to provide SAR support. Nicknamed the Grey Whales, these craft were initially based on SS Rangatira and then at Stanley Airfield. Flight 1564, as they were now known, moved to Navy Point in 1983. In 1999 the Grey Whales were gradually replaced with the more familiar yellow aircraft.

Currently 1564 Flight comprises two Sea King Mk 3s based at Mount Pleasant. Their primary role is to provide cover for the Typhoons, but they also devote considerable time towards supplying the more remote communications stations on the West.

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Rat eradication team sets out to restore island's precious wildlife

ANY readers startled at seeing bright red and yellow helicopters flying around Stanley early this week will have witnessed a sight to gladden the heart of Professor Tony Martin, leader of the South Georgia rat eradication project, which is due to begin on March 1.

The helicopters, two twin-engined Bolkow 105s, which are specially equipped for rat eradication, were being checked out before being flown on Wednesday onto the cruise ship Marina Svetaeva which will take them to South Georgia.

The basic procedure of what is the pilot stage of a four-phase project involves the dropping of some 56 tonnes of poisonous bait pellets – one for each rat – over five areas: Grytviken, Green Peninsula, Mercer Peninsula, Thatcher Peninsula and Saddle Island: amounting to some ten per cent of the island's total area and including many areas virtually inaccessible on foot.

Baiting too early could involve an unacceptable risk to some of the island's other wildlife, such as the South Georgia pintail or the South Georgia pipit, which the project is designed to protect and

foster. Baiting too late, on the other hand, runs the risk of winter setting in. Deep snow prevents the rats reaching the bait pellets, which are designed to disintegrate and disappear within a week or two.

Even baiting in late summer leaves certain species such as gulls and skuas at some risk from picking up the bait but, says Professor Martin, their populations will be

quick to recover and the loss of individuals can be afforded if whole species can be brought back from extinction.

The retreat- ing of the glaciers in South Georgia, which currently keeps rat populations separate, also adds urgency to the project, which employs technology developed over 20 years in New Zealand and has total eradication as its target.

Besides two rat eradication experts, two pilots, one flight engineer, a doctor and a loader, Professor Martin's team includes local South Georgia experts Sally and Dion Poncet, who are both experienced in rat eradication, and Ken Passfield, who will be the accommodation manager and cook.

The team will be accommodated at King Edward Point and the old whaling station engineers' shed at Grytviken will accommodate the helicopters.

Eight full flying days have been allocated to complete this first phase, which is costing some £2.7 million, but Professor Martin is adamant the team will stay in South Georgia until they have either accomplished what they set out to do or have been defeated by bad weather.

Should anyone feel sorry for the rats, which were brought to South Georgia 200 years ago, Professor Martin has on his laptop film of one eating a seabird chick alive, starting with its brain.

The eradication of this plague will, it is estimated, restore South Georgia's rightful place as one of the world's great sea bird sanctuaries.



PLEASE forgive me, but in order to fit in as many pictures of this beautiful landscape as I can, I have to be brief. Nothing could have prepared us for a perfect combination of sunshine, scenery, hard work and great company in which to recount old stories and create new ones.

The expedition started on January 17 as eight members of the Falkland Islands Defence Force - Major Peter Biggs, Lieutenant Justin McPhee, Corporals Kevin Ross and Geoffrey Loftus, Lance Corporal Zoran Zuvic-Bulic and Privates Sam Cockwell, Nick Rendell and myself - arrived at Mare Harbour with sea sickness patches applied and eager to board HMS Gloucester to depart for South Georgia.

The messes Two Romeo and Two Quebec were the welcoming hosts to the lads, and I was tucked away in a "snug" ventilation cupboard. Referred to as Team Green by the crew of the Gloucester, we conducted our patrol alongside the Royal Marines, with Captain Ian McGill as route leader to explore the Barff Peninsula.

We landed by Lynx Helicopter and, after a few tumbles shaking out our newly established sea legs, we made good ground arriving at Round Bay, first camp, soon after midday.

Leaving our full kit, up to 75 pounds for those with extra radio and climbing gear, we continued with day sacks to scale Mt Skittle, traversing tentatively down to St Andrews Bay where the largest colony of King Penguins in the world lined the glacial river from the retreating Cook Glacier running from the dramatic Allardyce Range beyond.

The summer defrost had uncovered a landscape of endless shale that provided loose support to large mountains of rock threatening to fall on us or from underneath us. This caused difficulty on the second day when scaling over 1000 feet, nearly vertically, with our full rucksacks threatening to pull us back down again.

Ocean Harbour was the reward for our efforts; almost unanimously agreed by FIDF and the RMR to be the most beautiful sight of the trip, and possibly the world.

A brilliant sun lit up the arena of effortlessly cascading waterfalls inviting us to the remains of a whaling station and ship that had been over-worked by nature. Up from the crystal sea, layers of seals, penguins and herds of reindeer were reduced to specks against the fairytale backdrop of mountain ranges, perfection unrivalled by any

computer's CGI brain or the greatest fantasy novels. Unexpected dangers came from the tussac too, with the small stature fur seals punching above their weight, and even the pups causing a few sprints on the coast. Welcoming sights were the laid-back elephant seals, especially now that the pastime of surprise seal rodeo is no longer pursued.

We reached the shore by the Nordenskjold Glacier by 4pm on Friday, but were unable to continue to the colony of Macaroni penguins at Rookery Bay when a rising tide blocked our route.

Realising the ambitiousness of the original route and failing accuracy of the maps to note the summer's terrain, it was decided that the second camp, by the glacier, should be our last.

Accomplishing over 50 kilometres of ascents, descents and traverses through shale and bogs, South Georgia proved itself a land not to be underestimated, but predicting its next move was as impossible as the good weather we enjoyed.

Day three standing by a glacier in a t-shirt was not expected. We ascended a glacial wall using our crampons and ice axes under the tutelage of the marine leaders, accompanied by the occasional thunderous roar of a football pitch sized

chunk of ice cracking off to meet the sea and join the flotilla of icebergs we were to keep watch for at 2am on the Gloucester.

Reluctant to leave, but gratefully informed we had a chance to explore Grytviken and Mt Hodges, we were treated to another Lynx cab ride, buzzing the Marines in their boat as we flew.

Thanks to Zoran for signing us up immediately, we were able to spend a day exploring Shackleton's memorial and grave as well as the museum and whaling station.

On leaving Grytviken we caught an FIDF member on a bicycle balancing a huge box of washing powder and various supplies off his handlebars: local running terrier Hugh Marsden.

The next day Hugh proved experience reigns over unwitting youth when he guided me around the murderous South Georgia Half Marathon course while the FIDF lads took the direct route to the summit of the infamous Mt Hodges.

I could talk for hours on what we did and have done to those who have dared to ask, but it is agreed we have fuelled the Canopus Bar at the FIDF Hall with enough escapades for years.

The Australian wool market is continuing its strong run and a new record EMU has been reached of 784 pence per kg.
Market analysts state that there is very good evidence to show the strong wool prices are a result of the really tight global supplies of the fibre meeting with strong demand in key markets.
Dr Paul Swan, market intelligence and trade reporting manager for Australian Wool Innovation notes that these positive fundamentals are medium to long term meaning two years plus.
However anecdotal evidence suggests that while prices are high there is some resistance from buyers. Time will tell if positive sentiment results in a healthy wool cheque!

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For most residents of the Falkland Islands, Consolidated Fisheries, or CFL as it is better known, is one of the many local fishing companies operating out of the Islands. Most will recognize that it is the company which sponsors the annual Falklands Conservation Ball and the Half-marathon. Many will know that the toothfish at the Chandlery and on the menus in the restaurants comes from CFL and will recognize the logo when they see it. Others may recognize the longliner, *CFL Gambler*, when she makes her regular visits to FIPASS.



What they may not know, however, is that 23 years after the declaration of the Fisheries Conservation Zones and 2

years after the implementation of an ITQ system, CFL remains in the unique position of being the only wholly locally owned fishing company where all its activities are actively driven and managed by Falkland Islanders.

CFL contributes millions of pounds to the local economy each year through licence fees, wages, crew travel, harbour dues, berthing, storage and agency fees, engineering and freight services, fuel, company tax and donations to charity. The *CFL Gambler* counts Stanley as its home port which means that its core activities - other than dry docking and specialist surveys - are all carried out in the fishing grounds and at FIPASS. This important contribution to vessel activity in the Islands represents significant business opportunities for local companies and individuals.



CFL's sole income is the sale of fish. Unlike most other fishing companies that have licences for a variety of species, CFL targets and sells only one, Patagonian Toothfish, also known as *Chilean Seabass*. It is a high value species and as restrictions on unregulated and unlicensed fisheries have grown over the years it has been in increasing demand in both the US and the Far East. The fish is sold mainly as Headed, Gutted and Tailed (HGT) although there is consistent demand for sub-products such as Collars, Cheeks and Heads which are sold into Asia. Even

tails can be occasionally popular making the yield from a single fish one of the most efficient on the market

CFL packs a fairly big punch for a small company. Although it owns only one vessel its fishery represents around 7% of the world's legal catches of toothfish and its brand name is recognizable to most importers and distribu-



tors around the world. Whilst most other toothfish fisheries are restricted to seasonal activity, the Falkland Island Fishery is year-round, a boon to importers needing to achieve a regular supply to their customers. Over the years CFL has developed a reputation for high quality and environmentally friendly product available regularly throughout the year.

The reputation of any fishing company is partially dependent on the reputation of the fishery in which it operates. CFL is fortunate in this regard: the Islands have an excellent record for sound fisheries management where protection of the resource is valued highly at both scientific and political levels. The principle of sustainability, the main tenet of fisheries management, does not just extend to the fishing resources but to other species that can be affected by fishing activity, such as albatrosses and petrels. The Falkland Islands was one of the first countries to develop National Plans of Action to mitigate incidental mortality of seabirds and as a result of years of investment and co-operation between the Fisheries Department, Falklands Conservation and CFL, the Islands can now be proud of negligible seabird mortality rates in the longline fishery

In 2008 CFL began funding a postgraduate position at the

Fisheries Department to study the growth, ageing, reproductive processes, geographical distribution and feeding habits of toothfish in the Falkland Islands. This is a significant benefit to the development of local scientific knowledge and reflects the co-operative approach between the industry and the Fisheries Department in the Falklands.

The Falkland Island fishery has come a long way since 1987. Emerging from a new and inexperienced industry, local companies are now notable players in a competitive global industry. As the industry continues to develop, CFL will remain at the heart of investment in new and pioneering business activities to the ultimate benefit of all.

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Your Questions Answered

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Q HOW many people are eligible to receive benefit or special payments from the Government in the following categories: unemployed, training schemes, the disabled or special needs, or other? How much is paid per week per person? What is the total amount paid out each week? How do you qualify to be in receipt of this payment?

Sharon Kelly provided this answer as Acting Team Leader of Social Services:

A THIS is not an easy question to answer briefly, as the eligibility criteria for each programme varies and the criteria can be quite lengthy. A brief summary of each of the three major schemes we believe the question relates to is as follows:

1. Entry-to-Employment (E2E) or the Employment Programme: this provides training and work placements specifically for school leavers who are unable to access employment or further education immediately on leaving school. Placements are for one year and are targeted at an area in which the young person wishes to pursue a career.

The Employment Programme is for people over the age of 17 who are experiencing difficulty finding employment or who have special needs and require assisted employment.

Eligibility is dependent on being an FI status or PRP holder, though others may be considered in exceptional circumstances.

The person needs to have been unemployed for at least six weeks or earning less than £39.80 per week.

Members of the scheme capable of unsupported work may only be on the scheme for a maximum of 12 months.

For full details please contact Jock Elliot at the Training Centre.

2. Welfare Allowances: to be eligible for welfare payments, in-

dividuals must have Falkland Island Status or hold a PRP. In exceptional circumstances, other residents can be considered for financial assistance.

Individuals also need to be out of work for a minimum of two weeks.

Individuals must also be one of (a) a single parent, (b) not eligible for the employment programme, (c) in special circumstances or (d) unable to work due to ill health.

The amounts payable under the scheme are as follows: single Adult (18+) £99, married couple £145, dependants/first child £30.50, and each subsequent child £19.70.

3. Attendance Allowance: to be eligible for attendance allowance a person must need help with personal care, washing and dressing, going to the toilet or something similar.

The person needs someone to keep an eye on them and/or is suffering from a terminal illness and is not expected to live more than six months, or the person cannot walk at all or has difficulty in walking that requires someone to help them.

The applicable rates for attendance allowance are categorised into three areas: low rate £29.75, medium rate £57, high rate £86.25.

For full details of the exact eligibility criteria for welfare and attendance allowance payments please contact Sharon Kelly at Social Services.

The financial details as of December 24 2010 are as follows: there are 22 people on the employment programme receiving £101 per week each, to a total cost of £2,226 per week.

There are currently no persons on the E2E programme. If there were they would be receiving £30 maintenance per week.

Welfare allowances and attendance allowances are paid to 39 people. They receive £71 per week to a total cost of £2,750 each week.

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Glenn wins fifth Open in a record

GLENN Ross won his fifth Stanley Open last weekend and at the same time broke the course record in his second round.

Twenty players completed the two-day competition, co-sponsored by Consultancy Services and new sponsors, accountancy firm PKF.

The course was in excellent condition and was played on the Saturday in a southeasterly wind while the Sunday round reverted to the usual prevailing westerly, making considerably different playing conditions over the two days.

Saturday's round was the usual shotgun start, ending with Glenn Ross shooting an excellent 72 to leave him four shots ahead of second placed Troyd Bowles.

Carol Lee, Sarah Bowles and Tony McMullen were grouped together in third place on 78 while defending champion Kevin Clapp joined Tony Roche on 79. There were eight birdies on the first day.

Sunday's second round followed the traditional format of the leaders going out last, and it would take a really low score to catch Glenn who was not about to let this happen.

Steady golf meant Glenn had extended his lead after the first nine, which he completed in one under par. He then eagled the tenth

to extend his lead even further and, despite dropping three shots on the way back in, he carded a new course record of level par 67, beating Troyd's record of 68. Glenn's winning total of 139 bettered the Stanley Open record of 143 by four shots. Troyd did his best to stay in touch, adding an excellent 69 to his first round 76.

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
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

Business counting the cost of food shortages

BUSINESSES in the Falklands are growing increasingly agitated as Argentina's shipping restrictions continue to mimic an economic blockade in all but name.

While major food retailers such as the West Store and Seafish Chandlery have been able to divert their orders from Chile to the UK, with minimal effect on actual stock, others have no alternative but to take it on the chin.

Among the worst hit by the fresh food shortages is Stanley Growers, which has lost upwards of £15,000 in orders in the past fortnight alone.

Even though the Islands' largest nursery was able to supplement its home grown produce by strengthening links with partners in Brazil and Uruguay, delays in those supplies reaching the Falklands have led to acute shortages.

Stanley Growers boss Tim Miller admits he has been badly hit: "Overall we are currently at zero stock levels for most products other than our own grown salads.

"That means everything that comes by sea – apples, oranges, pears, lemons and melons, what I call the durable fruits, and all the durable vegetables, such as cab-

bage, carrots, onions and beetroot," he told the Penguin News. "We are turning away orders to all those ships in the harbour, left, right and centre.

"With lost business with the oil industry and the fishing fleet as well, within the past ten days we have had to turn down £10,000 in orders. On the local front it is a similar situation – we haven't been able to buy it and people haven't been able to eat it.

"This week has cost us £5,000 worth of sales in Stanley alone."

Paul Lewis of the West Store said while his business had not lost any money since imports from Chile became problematic, his main challenge had been the logistics of supply.

"We need to get goods on the shelves and to be reliable we have to use the military boats," he said.

"Our main supply chain now is through the UK, and if we run out of something we have to wait for the next boat.

"We have maintained supply of the basics but we appreciate

some of our competitors have struggled."

Neville Hayward at Seafish Chandlery said he too was satisfied with his importing arrangements, having secured alternative supplies via the military, and the fortnightly flights carrying oil workers to and from the UK.

"We seem to be doing fine thanks to the oil flight which has been made available to us," he said.

"They have chilled space available for yoghurt and the like, so at least the customers have something to look forward to.

But he admitted: "If it wasn't for that we'd be buggered."

Argentina effectively turned the screw on imports from Chile when it announced last year a decree requiring all shipping bound for the Falklands to seek permission from the Argentine Government.

South American Atlantic Service Ltd (SAAS), which chartered the main supply vessel, responded by establishing a new route between Stanley and Rio Grande in Brazil.

But last month SAAS announced it would suspend operations from June, citing "operational reasons."

Mr Lewis said: "It makes sense to restore those links to Chile if we can, but it's really complicated. I wouldn't want to put money on it either way. The other thing is, if the SAAS route stops it puts the whole of South America out of the picture."

While air carrier LAN has continued to provide freight space for eggs and limited other perishables, peak tourist season also has impacted on supplies.

Mr Miller said: "LAN do everything they can to carry as much as possible, but the plane does not have elastic sides. Argentina's actions are having a major impact on this business, and have been since they started with the second LAN flight ban and the charter flights bans in 2003."

Meanwhile, amid the uncertainty over future imports of fresh produce, come predictions from Chile that their fruit and vegetable prices are set to soar by up to 20 per cent because of the country's water shortage.

"My supplier hasn't been looking at the markets yet," said Mr Miller.

"But if things shoot up over there, so will his prices to me."

FALKLAND ISLANDS

EVEN for a relatively recent arrival to the Falklands such as me, the economic pressure being exerted on the food front by way of Argentina's beligerence is becoming more than bothersome. What were once novelties – the occasional potato shortage or the disappearance of a favourite line from the supermarket shelves – are now real nuisances. And, as Tim Miller emphasises in this week's lead story on fruit and vegetable shortages, the prognosis is not good.

Zero stock levels for most products other than home grown salads would spell disaster for many food importers, and Tim deserves much credit for gritting his teeth throughout these tedious and trying times. Further reports that some of those foodstuffs that he does import from Chile are now forecast to soar in price because of water shortages in the country are hardly likely to wipe the grimace from his face, or ours.

Meanwhile, grumblings of growing unrest are apparent from within the business community (page 5), where some are urging Falkland Islanders to wrestle more control over their own air and sea links because "we are at the whim of bureaucrats overseas who have little regard for human rights or our self-determination."

Suggesting that "confidence in our future is being rapidly eroded by the actions of our hostile neighbours," they go on to say Islanders should take a proactive stance "instead of having to react to a situation dictated by the actions of others."

This call to arms, as it were, is stirring stuff. Borne out of a combination of passion and frustration, the writers argue: "Let's take the initiative and not be outflanked; do it now before it's too late. Doing nothing is not really an option."

We know discreet moves are afoot (they have been ever since 1982, to be honest) in an effort to resolve this country's latest imbroglio, as I touched upon in another recent opinion piece.

At that time I also wrote: "If there is deep and angry indignation, it appears not to be being broadcast beyond these shores."

It is good, therefore, to see Tim Miller and our anonymous business friend bucking that trend, echoing sentiments which are slowly growing louder across these Islands.

But there is no need for the vegetable thief among us to exacerbate the situation by half-inching a couple of cabbages from one of his neighbours. We can do without idiots making life even harder for those who are struggling to cope with the current shortages.

New Illex season makes 'reasonable' beginning

THE Falklands Illex season began this week and by Wednesday afternoon 57 jiggers, mostly from Taiwan and Korea, had called in to Stanley for licences.

Director of Natural Resources John Barton called the level of interest in licences "reasonable," adding that it was unusual to have the vessels coming in this early, which might reflect reports from Argentina that recent catches on the high seas had been poor.

The Illex season of 2010 brought a total catch of 12,105 tonnes, which was the fourth lowest catch of this squid since the beginning of the fishery in 1987.

While acknowledging many factors could affect the abundance of Illex for the 2011 season, Alexander Arkhipkin, Senior Fisheries Scientist with the Falkland Islands Fisheries Department, did not rule out a partial recovery of the South Patagonian Stock, as happened in 2006 after the poor year of 2005.

Dr Arkhipkin said: "Forecast-

ing the Illex catch in the Falklands Economic Exclusion Zone (EEZ) is complicated. It is one of the straddling stocks in the Southern Atlantic which migrates through the Exclusive Economic Zones of Brazil, Uruguay and Argentina and, on the high seas at 42°S and 45-47°S beyond the Argentinean EEZ, before it gets to us.

"Effective management and conservation of this important resource is therefore only possible by some kind of regional fisheries management organisation (RFMO) that should include all countries whose fleets are participating in exploitation of Illex stocks. So far, such an organisation does not exist, and this makes the squid stocks vulnerable to over-exploitation, especially in years of low abundance.

"In the past, Illex stocks were monitored during their migrations in Argentinean and Falkland waters by the bilateral Argentine-UK South Atlantic Fisheries Commission (SAFC). The SAFC organised

joint research surveys of Illex recruitment before the fishing season, supervised the exchange of commercial and biological information between the respective fisheries authorities, and subsequent joint estimation of the spawning stock biomass (SSB).

"If the SSB was calculated as falling below the threshold of 40,000 tonnes for the Southwest Atlantic, the SAFC recommended early closure of the Illex fisheries in Argentina and the Falklands, with early closures being implemented in a number of years.

"The SAFC also organised joint meetings between Argentinean and UK/Falklands scientists to exchange opinions on the fisheries.

"Unfortunately, since 2005, the SAFC has been largely moribund as the Argentine Government reduced co-operation, declining to continue the routine joint meeting process and suspending joint scientific activities. This has undoubtedly increased the vulnerability of Illex squid stocks."

Rockhopper well poses questions

ROCKHOPPER Exploration's declaration on Friday of the results of its second well to target the Sea Lion Prospect in the North Falkland Basin was followed immediately by a 17 per cent drop in the company's share price.

While the well was not a water-filled disaster like Desire Petroleum's Rachel well, it clearly fell short of market expectations.

The well was drilled to 2,830 metres, 8km away from the original Sea Lion well, hitting four separate sections with 64 gross metres of "good quality" reservoirs.

Oil was recovered to the surface, but further testing revealed three of the four reservoirs were found to have high water saturation (above 90 per cent).

The remaining reservoir had 64 per cent water saturation.

While there were signs some investors had anticipated a less than positive result and had begun selling Rockhopper shares before the announcement, leading to a drop of over 100p per share in four days, some oil industry analysts seem to have taken a more positive view of the recent

Rockhopper findings, one saying that although the result did not provide much oil it did provide plenty of encouragement.

Respected Fox-Davies analyst Lionel Therond said: "The large 8km out-step from the initial discovery well was always more exploratory in nature than pure appraisal.

"Accordingly, the results of this second well on the Sea Lion complex are difficult to interpret in the context of the first well, and more questions seem to have been raised than answered."

Bumper raffle

TRUSTEES of the Alex McGhie Fund - Charlene Rowland, Wendy Reynolds and Jodie McGhie - are launching a major raffle this month. The fund is the only registered charity in the Falklands which is specifically aimed at supporting children with special needs, and their families here in the Islands, by providing assistance to purchase items which cannot be supplied from health, education or other authorities.

Brown trout

CURRENT legislation designed to make the sale of brown trout illegal is so poorly written that it cannot be enforced, the Environmental Committee was told at its last meeting on February 7. Members agreed that the sale of brown trout should be illegal and that a paper should be submitted to ExCo recommending a change to the current law.

Vandalised

A UK memorial to the men who died in the Falklands War has been vandalised. The plaque next to the Square Tower in Old Portsmouth has had the words "God Bless You David" etched into it. It is hoped the plaque can be restored before the city's annual Falkland Islands service and parade on June 19.

Gypsy Cove

IMPROVEMENTS planned for Gypsy Cove, including increasing the size of the car park, construction of toilets, a refreshments area and a bus shelter, are estimated to cost approximately £20,000. A further £15,000 will be required to cover the costs of wardens and maintenance.

Six to fish SG

TOOTHFISH licences have been offered to six vessels to fish in the South Georgia Maritime Zone in the 2011 season, with a total quota of 1,800 tonnes. The 2011 season will start on April 21 and end on August 31.

Island Plan

THE Management Plan and the principle of designating Sea Lion Island as a National Nature Reserve have been approved by ExCo. The Attorney General is now working towards putting relevant legislation in place.

Seals jump

THE annual report of the long-running study of the Elephant Seal population on Sea Lion Island shows a three per cent increase in numbers this year.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

CAREFUL readers may have been confused by some of the timings alluded to in last week's diary, for the good reason that it was the previous week's "lost" by Penguin News. I duly sent in an updated one which was also "lost" and the previous one printed in its place.

AN important reason for presenting questions for oral reply in Legislative Assembly is to air issues publicly. The Assembly Member normally knows the answer but wants it to be a matter of public record. Questions for written reply serve a similar purpose but may not get the same coverage. Of course we now have many other methods of promulgating information, including this column. I would again urge anyone thinking of standing in the next general election to study things like Assembly Standing Rules and Orders, the Constitution and FIG structure generally. If elected they will then be able to do the job for which they have been chosen. It is something with which some members occasionally wrestle; decisions can be made on a simple majority, not on the basis of he or she who shouts loudest and last.

I'VE received a number of interesting suggestions on parking around Stanley, including possible one-way systems which would also ease the traffic flow in the busiest times. These times could hardly be described as rush hours as the lunchtime one begins with traffic from various remoter FIG departments heading up the bypass and into Stanley before 12pm, to be joined by office, business and schools traffic at 12pm. By ten past all is quiet. I've been amused several times recently by have a speed gun pointed at me around midday while driving slowly past the Police Station in a line of vehicles doing barely 20mph. I did suggest at the last Police Committee meeting that the longer straights on Ross Road East and West may be a better target as even heavy vehicles reach some alarming speeds on occasions. I'm sometimes tempted to park my Land Rover on the road as a traffic calming measure when the boy racers are doing circuits.

Islanders urged to combat aggression from Argentina

A LOCAL business is urging fellow Falkland Islanders to take a more proactive stance to deal with the continuing aggression shown by the Argentine Government towards the country through its trade and communications blockade.

Representatives of the business suggest efforts are required to break the "stranglehold of third parties" and explore options for Islanders to play a greater role in determining their future business and commercial interests.

"Our sea and air links are continuously under threat from outside influences, it can be argued, creating a climate of uncertainty, poor decision making and under development," they say.

"We are at the whim of bureaucrats overseas who have

little regard for human rights or our self-determination.

"Since 1982 our nation has changed out of all recognition, from our once monopolistic society we have matured into a vibrant, mature and modern community, confident in our future, with a willingness to embrace development.

"Alas that confidence in our future is being rapidly eroded by the actions of our hostile neighbours."

One particular opportunity for investment, the business people say, are the country's air and sea links, which should be controlled and run by Falkland Islanders.

"Yes, it would cost money. But it will be sound investment, taking a proactive stance instead of having to react to a situation dictated by the actions of others. We are confident that we would

see long-term gains, such as business confidence and development, potential inward investment and, best of all, a controlling share in our own vital communication links.

"It is time for change," the business argues.

"No longer should we rely on air and sea links we have no control over. Our future should be in our own hands.

"We should be positive, working together to make it so, not be forced into making knee-jerk decisions further down the line.

"Let's take the initiative and not be outflanked, do it now before it's too late. Doing nothing is not really an option."

The manager of the business declined to be identified, but was happy for their comments to be reported by the Penguin News.

Rumble in the cabbage patch

AN announcement sent to the Penguin News and local radio by the Thain family this week caused more than a few ripples among Stanley's vegetable patches.

They wrote: "The vegetable thief currently operating in our town, who was caught red-handed in the early hours of Saturday but unfortunately escaped, is invited to 8 Davis Street to collect "his" wheel barrow.

"Two of the stolen cabbages are from someone else's garden. These have been replanted and are doing fine. The owner of these can collect in approximately eight weeks when they will be ready for harvesting."

The radio announcement was probably the first intimation most people had that Stanley had been prey to a nocturnal vegetable thief. Craig Thain had grappled with the

vagabond, but had been unable to detain him,

Possible pseudonyms such as Radish Raider, Vegetable Villain or Cabbage Crim soon abounded, as did speculation about the identity of the suspect on social networking sites.

There were also conflicting theories about possible motivation and method, with some claiming the fact that young cabbages had been taken from the ground with roots intact instead of being cropped, indicated the thief was a gardener intent on replanting rather than a hungry vegetarian.

With the Horticultural Society's annual show fast approaching, there were those also who saw jealousy or competitiveness as a possible motive.

Political protest at the currently impossibly high cost of eat-

ing the recommended "five a day" was largely ruled out by the thief's decision to steal from the people, rather than commercial organisations like Stanley Growers or institutions like Government House.

It is believed the police have conducted at least one house search and examined the footwear of at least one suspect, who was taken into custody for a period of some five hours on Tuesday before being released. There also are as yet unconfirmed reports of an identity parade being arranged.

The police have confirmed that the owner of the wheelbarrow which was abandoned when the thief was surprised has been found, but would not confirm that it was the one posted as missing on facebook by former art teacher and gardening enthusiast Mrs Mirabel (Tim) Simpson.

The men who gave their todays for our tomorrow

TUESDAY evening saw Reverend Dr Richard Hines welcome a large crowd who had respectfully gathered to unveil the HMS Glamorgan Memorial at Hookers Point.

HMS Clyde was off the coast to mark HMS Glamorgan's position when it was bombed in 1982, and the RAF surprised the crowd with a Typhoon flypast.

Captain Michael Barrow reflected on what had happened on that fateful day on June 12 when, so near to the liberation of the Islands, the ship was struck by an Argentine Exocet missile.

Shirley Chapman, sister of fallen crewman Brian Easton, read Psalm 46, and Stanley's Cub Scouts unveiled the Welsh granite monument from beneath HMS Glamorgan's own 1982 ensign.

The last post was followed by the haunting words of the Kohima epitaph, read by Commander Ian Inskip: "When you go home, tell of us and say, for your tomorrow we gave our today." The last line adorns the stone memorial.

Speeches and appreciations continued at the reception held in the Falkland Islands Defence Force bar afterwards. Captain Barrow thanked the SAMA Falk-

lands Trust, the Falkland Islands Government, FIDE, the Cubs and Morrisons Falklands for the monument's erection and alignment with "great skill and care."

Governor Nigel Haywood also was thanked for the warmth and sincere welcome offered to the veterans and families from people of the Falklands.

"After visiting the Islands I have a better understanding of the culture and beauty of the scenery, but what is most striking is the people," said Captain Barrow. "And I have no doubt that the

monument will be maintained." At the risk of singling people out, he also recognised the efforts of "Mr and Mrs Glamorgan/Falklands," Jan and Tim Miller, for their years of help.

Later Alan Watt, Chairman of the Glamorgan Association, announced that Morrisons Falklands had been made an honourable member of the Civil Engineers of Scotland. Governor Haywood hosted a reception in honour of HMS Glamorgan at Government House on Wednesday evening.

Horrors of fire fight continue to haunt surviving crewmen

THANKS to reading about the SS Great Britain, John "Bungy" Williams at least knew where the Falkland Islands were when it was announced HMS Glamorgan was to be deployed to the South Atlantic.

But the electrical mechanic, whose only prior experience of conflict was protecting British trawlers in the "Cod War" of 1975, was soon to be caught up in a deadly fire fight.

Up until May 1 1982, when the Glamorgan was on exercise in Gibraltar, he expected her deployment to the Falklands to be "a bit of flag waving, then home for a cup of tea."

But despite finding herself on a war footing, the ship was well prepared. "We knew what were doing as a fighting platform," said Mr Williams. "We actually had a lot of people who could improvise, and we developed tactics throughout the time here," he said.

The saving of the Glamorgan was in its efficiency, and everyone knowing their jobs. He explained how it was within the ambit of the "greenies" and stokers, the engineers and electricians to undertake damage control. The seamen would fight the ship, while

others tended to be in support. We were, as weapons electrical, the primary fire fighters and damage control, and our training was shown by the events of the 12th."

An Argentine Exocet hit the Glamorgan some 15 feet from John. He remembers a lot of the fear that should have been present did not get an opportunity to show itself. The training kicked in and automatic response took over.

Glamorgan was ready to fight again on the 13th and came closer to shore to repair and do the usual safety procedures when the Argentines surrendered on the 14th. This was the setting for one of his most poignant memories.

"In preparation for us going home to dry dock an advance party

had to be sent. The party would be on leave and when the ship came back alongside in Portsmouth, they would take over and the rest of us would go on leave.

"There were very few volunteers. In fact I don't think there were any, so we had to draw lots and the losers went home early.

"We wanted to go alongside as Glamorgan. We were Glamorgan."

He continued: "We were all quite young and beaten up mentally, but the other half of us was saying 'All right, I've done a job.' It's something we were trained to do, and there's a certain amount of pride in a job well done.

"There were a lot of funny times and there were a lot of very sad times. I spend personally far too much time fighting the fire in my mind. I still fight it because I think I could have done things differently. Intellectually it challenges the heart, which is always telling you you should have been better."

Survivors' guilt is dealt with on a daily basis by many, but John is grateful that Glamorgan now has an association bound strong through their shared experiences.

"This monument is gorgeous, thank you," he asked us to tell the people of the Falklands.

Work, rest and play for kids at Kid-ney Island

KIDNEY Island at the mouth of Berkeley Sound is rat-free and covered in dense tussac, making it one of the Falklands' top sites for Cobb's Wrens as well as huge numbers of sooty shearwaters and other seabirds that are only present on rat-free islands.

As such it is of major interest to the Cobb's Wren Conservation Project (CWCP), run by Sally Poncet and administered by Nick Rendell of the FIG's Environmental Planning Department.

Among the project's various activities over the past two years of its existence have been rat eradications, surveying islands for Cobb's Wrens, rats and wildlife in general and organising trips for the public to Kidney Island.

Earlier this month it was the turn of Year 2 of the Stanley Infant and Junior School to visit the island with CWCP. This was one of the Project's last activities and, according to Sally Poncet, one of its most enjoyable.

Sally writes: "The 44 children who came out were full of fun and enthusiasm and keen to learn. For some, it was their first time on a

first time to see sea lions, Cobb's Wrens and even jumping jacks."

Karen Neely, from Falklands Conservation's WATCH Group, was the main guide for the day and kept everyone entertained and listening (most of the time), along with Sally, class teachers Alison Short and Dorinda Rowlands, and learning support assistants Rose Toolan, Priscilla Betts, Stephanie Thain and Karen Marsh.

Ken Passfield, who has been involved in all of CWCP's activities, kept an eye out for sea lions and helped with the landings

as children arrived and departed on the Sullivan launches.

The Cobb's Wren Project ends in March this year, but it is planned to make the Kidney Island trip for Year 2 IJS students an annual event as part of their coursework about Falklands wildlife and environment.

Most of the funding for CWCP comes from the UK Government's Overseas Territories Environment Programme (OTEP). The Antarctic Research Trust, Falklands Conservation and Beaver Island LandCare are also supporting the project.

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Police partnership works for civilians and military

STEPHEN Lapham and Jill Roberts are the faces of a joint services-civilian police partnership which is working wonders for communities both in Stanley and at MPA.

Royal Navy Police Officer Stephen, a member of the Joint Service Police and Security Unit, and Royal Falkland Islands Police Officer Jill have to an extent switched roles.

Stephen has established a Service Police Office at Hillside Camp providing a reassuring presence and point of military focus for the local community.

He works most Saturday nights alongside RFIPO Officers but describes his role as flexible, dependent on current requirements: "Myself and my unit look at what's going on and target the anticipated busier periods when service personnel are most likely to be present in Stanley," he says.

Jill works as a part-time civilian police officer at MPA. She is used to community policing, and all that it entails, such as visiting people in sheltered housing, shops and pubs.

"Since moving up to MPA I've seen that there is an absolute civilian community there," she says.

"Any people that know I'm still a reserve police officer do approach me with their little problems and say they do need a police officer up here.

"No disrespect to the military, but often I think they prefer speaking to a civilian police officer. Working alongside JSPSU is good for me, and it's good for them."

Both officers agreed that the police duties are basically the same in both locations.

Stephen and Jill have in the past worked at their respective locations, Stephen during a previous tour in the Islands between 2003 and 2005, and Jill when she was a full-time police officer.

Stephen says service police have been stationed in Stanley in the past, but it was the choice of individual OCs and unit commanders to decide on the best allocation of resources, and the role was disestablished.

After returning to the Falklands in May 2009 he spent a year working at the Service Police Station at Mount Pleasant: "During this time I highlighted the importance of reviving a more community based policing role and fortunately that's now come to fruition."

Chief Police Officer Gary Finchett says service police are only requested when they are needed: "They have never been used to cover staff shortages, they have always been used to supplement existing staff.

"For example, when a whole ship's company is coming down to Stanley, it's extremely beneficial to have Stephen or JSPSU here, to be honest, to relate to those service personnel."

Describing the RFIPO's relationship with the JSPSU as excellent, Mr Finchett says he is always keen to have a reserve officer working within the MPC community.

"Jill has lots of skills, in terms of the manner in which you police communities here, and she has brought particular expertise in terms of helping the JSPSU and working alongside the JSPSU, to police what is not just a military community, but quite a large civilian community."

He describes it as a community with similar issues to those faced in Stanley or elsewhere, and any such community will benefit from having a more permanent face in their midst.

"Jill is there for the longer term," he says. "They can build relationships with her and, on occasions, there may well be a very good reason why they would want to speak to a civil officer, rather than a service police officer. It really has been a valuable partnership."

In comparison, Stephen's experience is a bonus in Stanley: "You have to remember that some of the service personnel that come down to us have just finished tours in Afghanistan, for example.

"So, while they are on tour in the Falklands, it is important they have the opportunity for some R&R in Stanley. Stephen understands that, he understands the military psyche."

Mr Finchett says the civilian population in Stanley and the military have always had an excellent relationship: "Because the boundaries between the military community and civilians can be so blurred, it makes perfect sense to have a joint team on patrol.

"I think we've always had an excellent relationship with JSPSU, but I think we went to the next level when we started this formal agreement. And it's got to be, I think, for the long term. I don't see this as a temporary arrangement.

"You can't deliver community policing unless you are within the heart of that community.

"Jill is in the heart of the MPA community, Stephen is at the very heart of our community. I think that's fantastic."

Chilean journalist reflects on sovereignty

THE benefit of encouraging opinion makers to visit the Falklands was demonstrated when an article translated as "Petrol sets the Falklands on fire" appeared on the website lanacion.cl, written by recent visitor and Chilean writer and journalist, Raul Sohr.

More than 2,000 words in length, and with headings such as Petroleum, The Military Situation and The Diplomatic Front, the article gives a very reasonable and balanced account of a number of aspects of our existence, beginning with the Argentine Government's attempts to interfere with shipping to and from the Islands and the loss of up to \$11 million annually suffered by businesses in Punta Arenas.

Reflecting that there appears to be no obvious solution to the sovereignty debate, Raul says the discovery of oil will add to the intransigence of both sides, with countries in the region like Chile being forced to take sides, at least in some aspects. He says: "It is the nature of such conflicts that they rarely benefit anyone, but can harm many."

The comments from his Chilean readers which follow also are of interest, with one writer claiming 89 per cent of Chileans supported the British in 1982, because they knew that if successful in the Falklands, General Galtieri's next step would have been to invade Chile.

One Chilean who says he is convinced it is both right and much better for us to be British, goes back in time to mention that the Argentine Government took advantage of Chile being engaged in defending its borders to the north to take Patagonia from Chile, and adds that to those who believe Argentina has always owned all the territory it currently claims, it should be pointed out that Mendoza was founded by the Chileans, who also formed a large portion of San Martin's army of liberation.

The tendency in South America for historical disputes over territory to live on well past their sell-by date is also demonstrated by one obviously Argentinean writer who urges: "It should not be forgotten that the British tried to take the whole of Argentina by force in 1806 and 1807," and goes on to claim that it was because of this failure that "the dirty British" took the Falklands in 1833.

Family donates island in honour of last soldier to be killed in '82

THE Phillips family of Hope Cottage Farm have handed ownership of a small island over to the parents of the last British serviceman killed in action before the end of the Falklands War.

Private Craig Jones, of the 3rd Parachute Regiment, who was aged 20, was hit by shrapnel during the Battle for Mount Longdon on June 13 1982, just before British troops entered Stanley.

His family, including father Richard, mother Pam and brother Gareth, had prepared a welcome home party after hearing of the Argentine surrender, only to discover Craig had died in the war's final minutes.

Now, thanks to the generosity of Carol and Terence Philips, and their son and daughter-in-law Paul and Shula, Craig's parents have realised their dream of naming the island after their son.

Deeds were this week exchanged and the six-acre island in Salvador Waters is now officially renamed Craig Island.

"Pam and I thought it was a lovely idea to buy some land and name it after Craig," said Mr Jones,

of Tenbury Wells. "It has taken about two years to sort out all the legal issues but now we have the deeds and it feels very special to have an island named after our son.

"The Falkland Islands are a long way away, but they are extremely important to us and other families who lost loved ones in the war."

About two years ago the Jones family had contacted Gary Clement, of the Falklands branch of veterans organisation SAMA82, with a request to honour their son's name by buying some land in the Falklands.

Gary passed on their request to Carol and, although they later had handed the farm over to Paul and Shula, the family decided to hand over the island as a gift.

"They didn't want to do anything with it," Carol told the Penguin News. "They just wanted a piece of land.

"Paul left it to me to sort everything out. We now have copies of the deeds and the Jones family have theirs in the post, so it is now their island.

"I speak to them quite often over the phone. They just can't

seem to thank us enough. They are over the moon. But if we can help anyone who helped liberate us in '82 we will."

Mr Jones hopes to visit Craig Island later this year with his son Gareth, 47, and grandson Alexander Craig, 17.

"The family from whom we acquired the land have been farmers in the Falklands for many years," said Richard, 74.

"During the conflict, they used their tractor and trailer to carry supplies for the Parachute Regiment during their attack on Mount Longdon and, after the fighting, they helped with the evacuation of the dead and wounded."

Carol said she was especially grateful to Keith Watson and John Rowland for helping sort out the legal requirements, and she hoped at some stage in the future a small sign could be placed on the island.

Craig was laid to rest in a temporary grave at Teal Inlet, just across the water from Craig Island, and is now buried at Aldershot Military Cemetery in Hampshire.

Seabirds wiped out during worst summer storm in living memory

THE UNUSUALLY severe storm on December 13-14 not only caused structural damage across the Islands, but also significant damage at some of the Falklands' most important seabird colonies.

Seabirds are generally well adapted to "bad" weather conditions, especially at sea, and indeed albatross colonies are by necessity located in windy areas. However, while breeding on land, extreme weather can - in the case of December's storm - cause significant damage at their colonies.

Two small teams from Falklands Conservation were working at Steeple Jason (owned by the Wildlife Conservation Society) and Beauchêne Island (FIG owned) during the storm event.

Steeple Jason holds about 170,000 pairs of black-browed albatross, the largest breeding colony in the world, and Beauchêne Island the second largest with around 100,000 pairs. Large numbers of rockhopper penguins also nest within these colonies.

Dr Anton Wolfaardt (ACAP co-ordinator, UK South Atlantic Overseas Territories), assisting with the FC work at Beauchêne, described the event: "By the evening of December 13 the wind speed had increased to 60-80 knots, resulting in open ocean swells in excess of ten metres. The south and west coasts of the island, where the majority of the seabirds nest, were especially exposed. As the wind increased in strength, we saw nesting albatrosses hunkered down on their nests and many using their wings to anchor themselves down to protect their eggs or small chicks.

We observed a single wave breaking over an area with several hundred alba-

tross, penguin and imperial shag nests, pulling out to sea many of the adult birds in the process. The storm continued to intensify through the night."

In the aftermath, it was evident that many albatross and rockhopper penguin nests had directly suffered from the storm.

One area of 13,000 albatross pairs lost 100 per cent of their nests, and initial estimates suggest that across the island as many as 20,000 albatross nests failed due to the exposure from prolonged sea spray and breaking waves.

About 10,000 rockhopper penguin nests in the south of the island were also lost, with many more likely. Several hundred adult albatross deaths were recorded, with many tangled in kelp and debris and washed up high into the tussac.

The storm had similar impacts at a number of other islands in the Falklands. At Steeple Jason, Dr Al Baylis (FC Conservation Officer), reported that one colony in the region of 12,000 breeding albatross pairs and 3,500 rockhoppers, suffered near 100 per cent breed-

ing failure. At Sea Lion Island the rockhopper penguin colony at Rockhopper Point lost all its 300 nests, with only one chick remaining. These natural events are beyond our control and difficult to predict. Such events need to be considered in the context of other threats that we can control. Mitigation of seabird by-catch in fisheries, habitat management at breeding sites and removal of invasive species are vital in preventing further losses of seabirds. These types of measures are already in action across the Falklands and it is im-

perative we keep these up well into the future to help buffer against population losses caused by other unforeseeable natural disasters.

The South Atlantic is no stranger to storm events. However, none until now have been recorded causing large numbers of adult albatross deaths or such significant breeding failure.

With predicted increases of strong storms due to climate change the frequency of these events may increase. As well as the immediate loss of hundreds of breeding birds, a longer-term consequence will be lower numbers of successfully fledged juveniles recruiting into the population as breeding adults in about ten years time.

Department of Agriculture Wool Market Report
11th February, 2011

Tony Mills, Department of Agriculture, Falkland Islands
The Australian wool market has eased a little since bursting to record highs. It is now running at 78.1 pence per kg down 4 pence from last week. Exchange rate volatility is masking the full extent of the drop which in AUD was 19 cents or 1.5%
China plays a strong role in the world wool market and analysts suggest that the easing was mainly on the back of lower levels of interest from Chinese buyers. Further analysis of this week's offering shows a higher proportion of crossbred wools and buyers critical of the quality of the offering.
Fundamentals are still quite strong but the resistance from buyers to higher prices may well be starting to have some influence.

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RMA swings into action to send Falklands rock to 45 Commando

JUST before Christmas, Captain Stevie Lewis of 45 Commando Royal Marines based at Royal Marines Condor in Arbroath, Scotland, made a request to the Royal Marines' Association Falkland Islands (RMA) for assistance in sourcing a piece of Falkland's rock.

The rock was needed as part of the Woodlands Garden Project that 45 Commando plans to have installed in its RM Condor base as a focal point for remembrance and reflection in the Commando.

Thirteen men of the Commando have been killed in action since 2006, and many more seriously wounded. The unit is soon to deploy to Afghanistan for the fourth time since 2002, during which time it also took part in operations in Iraq.

It is intended that Woodlands Garden will provide a tranquil site in which the families and serving men of 45 Commando can find solace. One metre tall stone globes, from every country the unit has fought in since moving to its Arbroath base in 1971, will be positioned within a walled garden, tastefully surrounded with shrubs, trees, pathways and a pavilion. In early January, with the help of Stuart Haines, Materials Manager

at Pony's Pass Quarry, a suitable piece of Falkland's quartzite rock was sourced, weighing in at 4.14 tonnes. Appropriately, the quarry is itself located just 5.5 kms from 45 Commando's 1982 battle objective, Two Sisters.

All that then remained was the weighty problem of how to get the rock back to Arbroath.

Everything started to happen when on Saturday February 5 it was made known to the RMA that the Falklands rock could be shipped back to Marchwood on

the FIRS vessel currently loading, but that it would have to be at Mare Harbour on Sunday to be loaded at 8am on Monday, provided that the Chief Officer was satisfied it was a safe load.


A couple of swift phone calls ascertained that Neil McKay was fortuitously just about to set off to Mare Harbour with a low loader and had room for the rock, also that Quarry Foreman Lard McLeod could arrange for the positioning of the rock on a forklift ready for lifting on to Neil's low

loader. The rock was delivered in good time and it was now down to 460 Port Troop to find suitable packaging for it and to load it on the FIRS, which they duly did. 45 Commando still has to get the rock from Marchwood to Arbroath of course, but Royal Marines are very resourceful! This whole episode must surely qualify as a Random Act of Kindness, except that it happened in the wrong week!

Chief of Police, Gary Finchett Surprising statement

IN a surprise statement, Governor Haywood announced last Friday that Chief Superintendent Gary Finchett would be leaving his post as Director of Community Safety and Chief Police Officer at the end of March, due to what were described as "personal family reasons which require him to return to the UK."

The Governor described Chief Superintendent Finchett as "an excellent Director and Chief Police Officer" who would be missed. He had done much to reinstall public confidence in the Police and to improve morale. Also mentioned in the statement was the leading role that Mr Finchett had played in reviews of immigration policy.

Following these personal tributes, the Governor announced that Executive Council would be advised this week that the opportunity would be taken to redesignate Chief Superintendent Finchett's post as Chief Police Officer and Director of Emergency Services.

The redesignation would be pending an independent review of FIG's management structure to be undertaken in September.

This reference to an independent review seemed to have surprised councillors at Tuesday's public meeting.

Details of how such a review would be carried out and by whom were "still up for discussion" according to chairman Cllr Bill Luxton.

Legal wrangles hold back ships

CONSOLIDATED Fisheries vessel Baffin Bay has been detained in Montevideo since Friday February 11, caught up in a situation which, according to Uruguayan press sources has caused fifteen Spanish vessels to boycott the port altogether and has attracted the "close attention" of that country's embassy in Uruguay.

The problem has been caused by courts in Montevideo seizing vessels and prohibiting their sailing in response to what is described as a "wave" of damages claims brought against vessels by crew members, usually of Peruvian origin, who have been encouraged by dock side lawyers to seek exorbitant amounts of money in compensation.

During 2010 courts in Uruguay seized ten fishing vessels, most of which were banned from leaving the port of Montevideo until an out of court agreement was reached with the plaintiff crew member, or following the presentation of a hefty bond as collateral.

In many instances the claims were for sums in excess of \$US100,000 and in one recent case a crew member was demanding \$US420,000.

Offers by ship owners to pay bonds to the court so that their vessels can return to the fishing grounds may be accepted, but are also not without complications and delays.

Such has been the case with Baffin Bay, which is facing two separate claims by two Peruvian brothers who had worked on the vessel for years until 2008 and 2009 respectively, when they failed to turn up for the new season without notification.

Before being detained, the vessel had been expected in Stanley on Wednesday to pick up its loligo licence.

Consolidated Fisheries has lodged two separate bonds with

the court for amounts described by Company Director Cheryl Roberts as "substantial" in order to free their vessel to resume fishing.

Unfortunately difficulties with transfers between international banks, together with time differences and the very restricted opening hours of the institutions concerned have all combined to add a further week of delay and frustration.

sage through Argentine waters when on its way to Montevideo to discharge catch from Falklands waters.

An increase in such cases is causing the Uruguayan authorities to seek solutions rather than run the risk of losing business estimated by Uruguayan union sources to represent some 1,000 tonnes of fish a year, or the equivalent in money terms of some \$US200 million.

As some compensation for the loss of revenue that the detention of the Baffin Bay represents, Mrs Roberts told Penguin News that her company had made a day-by-day arrangement with Seafish Ltd to allow their vessel Playa Pesmar Uno to use the Baffin Bay's catch entitlement until such time that the Baffin Bay is released and back in Falklands waters.

Similar problems have been faced by the Cabo do Cavo, another fishing vessel bound for the Falklands, but currently detained in Montevideo. The vessel's Falklands agent, Elvio Cofré says that he believes the case against the vessel was made by a Peruvian fisherman who was sent home because his mother was ill and never heard from again until the detention order was made. In September 2010 this vessel made the headlines when it was denied free pas-

However this is clearly not a new problem. Laurie Butler, of local fishing company Argos told the Penguin News that the Argos Vigo was detained in Montevideo two years ago, after two Peruvian crew men complained of bad treatment. The ship was only released after paying \$US40,000 bail and when the case eventually got to court this was converted to a fine, out of which the two complainants received only \$US5,000 each.

Mike Summers of Quark Fishing Ltd said that after investigating reports that his company's long-liner Jacqueline had been detained as a result of a legal claim being made against it, he was convinced this was not the case. Mr Summers said that his company's vessel is in Montevideo, but for work to be done in connection with safety certification.

AT a time when all across the Middle East ordinary people have been finding their voices and using them to challenge repressive regimes, last Tuesday's public meeting in Stanley's Town Hall presented a strange contrast. As Councillor Dick Sawle quipped when the meeting seemed to be about to die after half an hour of somewhat desultory questions, "This must be the quietest you've been all day. It's certainly the quietest we've been."

Though well-attended, the meeting finally expired with fifteen minutes of its allotted hour still to go. The only time when - again to borrow Cllr Sawle's phrase - "the blood quickened for a little while" was during a debate which he instigated on the plethora of signs prohibiting smoking adorning every table top and wall in Stanley. This, of course, gave him and fellow smokers in the Assembly the opportunity to score a few points against their banning brethren. It all went to prove, said Cllr Ross, that "smokers are a very tolerant lot, much more so than non-smokers."

All good fun, then, but it left me wondering why so many of the subjects that I had expected to be raised and hotly debated, like the proposals to amend the Telecommunications Bill about which my ears had been assailed earlier in the week, were left unmentioned.

In the middle of some collective amnesia resulting from a question about old tourism signs, I found I had written the following:

"How much can councillors say? How much do they know? Is the reluctance to ask due to a feeling that there is no point in asking?"

The most complete answer of the meeting, possibly prepared in advance by some member of the Civil Service, was given to a previously presented written question. This, coupled with the number of times when councillors had to admit that they did not have the full facts, the numbers, or the necessary documents before them to give a full answer, did make me question once again both the usefulness of this kind of meeting and, more importantly, whether our current parliamentary arrangements do not place an impossible burden of expected on-the-spot omniscience on our elected representatives.

When it was first mooted that FIG was to have eight "superheads" I had immediately and naively assumed that these would be the eight elected MLAs, full-time and given ministerial responsibility, who would work with secretarial support from adequate offices within the departments where they would spend the majority of their time and about which they would become expert. Given the sheer indigestible bulk of the information we ask our MLAs to command, is it any wonder that they sometimes appear to be mere spectators peering out together through the rose-tinted windows of Gilbert House at the chaos beyond?

Married women in legislation oversight

GOVERNMENT invests in individuals to study but it appears current legislation will not allow all of them to work with the status that qualified them for their education.

Our country clearly needs more home-grown professionals, but during a return home to the Islands, a fully-qualified former teacher in the Education Department (who prefers not to be named) was told when she offered her services to cover a temporary shortage that she could not work because her husband did not have Falkland Islands Status.

The woman, whose parents are status holders and live in the Falklands, arrived here aged nine and had status before leaving for further education. She had been told by councillors that her status would be reinstated once she landed in the islands, but instead Customs realised she needed a visitors permit.

"It's ridiculous, I offered my services as a primary teacher because I'm here for a while and the school was short-staffed. But I was told I can't work because I got married" she told the Penguin News.

Understandably concerned, the locally-funded trained professional will be meeting with customs officials to discuss her options, but as the Constitution stands she will have to apply for a work permit, putting her at the bottom of the pile for recruitment in any job.

The 2009 Constitution brought about changes to the definition of an Islander, as well as defining how to become one. You can no longer become an Islander through marriage, but what many are unaware of is how easily marriage can strip you of your status.

Chief Customs and Immigration Officer Robert King empathises with the problem, agreeing that loss of status would

not normally be expected as a result of your vows.

"Domicile is a complex matter" Mr King told the Penguin News referring to the term used to describe a person's place of permanent or legal residence. What is clear is that at present if a female who enjoyed Falklands Status before the constitutional change chooses to marry a man who is domiciled to another country, then she absorbs his domicile and loses affiliation to this country.

This regulation used to apply in the UK before the Domicile and Matrimonial Proceedings act of 1973 was introduced to give married women the same capacity as anyone else to independently choose their domicile.

Mr King believed that the present anomaly occurred "possibly because it wasn't thought of at the time and provisions were not made to amend the old constitution" but he assures that everything is being done to remedy the situation. However, Cllr Gavin Short said "it was not tracking high in the work stream" and isn't likely to be changed before they have dealt with more pressing matters.

When asked whether females who were born here would lose their domicile to the Falklands Mr King said "if someone has status from birth, in virtually all cases, provisions will be made to reacquire status." The problem affects those who were not born here, but enjoyed Falkland Islands status before the Constitution changed and it does not affect holders of permanent residence permits.

Another concern all status holders should be aware of is that after absence from the country for two or more years, government can investigate and in the absence of valid grounds for absence, like education or medical treatment, he or she will be domiciled to their present country of residence.

Meeting Matters

SOME twenty or so members of the public attended this month's public meeting with Legislative Assembly Members held in the Court and Council Chamber of the Town Hall on Tuesday evening. All the members of the Assembly were present with the exception of Roger Edwards who is out of the country and Emma Edwards whose duties at the Community School prevented her attendance. Here are some of the subjects raised:

Autopilots

IN response to a question from Tim Miller about what safety criteria made necessary the installation of autopilots in some FIGAS planes, councillors gave an assurance that they had asked the same question. Cllr Luxton said that while the autopilots could not land the plane in an emergency they would help prevent the kind of pilot disorientation sometimes caused by flying into clouds.

Recruitment

THE situation regarding the hold-up in the recruitment of a new headteacher for the Community School which was described by Philip Middleton as "a mess," was admitted to be "unsatisfactory" by Cllr Jan Check.

Cllr Check said that she believed the decision had been to postpone recruitment to give time to make the post appear more attractive in what was a very competitive and expensive market.


None of the councillors were aware how far the recruitment process had gone before it was halted and suggested that the facts might be available from the Human Resources Department.

Dangerous wool

ASKED by farmer Ricky Evans if future shipments of wool were likely to be regarded as dangerous cargo, Cllr Check said that the hope was that the Falklands could be given a long-term exemption, as had clearly been achieved by other wool-shipping countries. A decision was expected this week.

FIG as swan

THE Assembly was compared to a swan by Bill Luxton, who assured the audience that although the effort was not apparent, much work was being done to restore shipping links. Cllr Jan Check said that she and her colleagues were aware that action was needed within a few weeks.

Investigation plan for Warrah find site

FOLLOWING 13 year old Dale Evans finding of what is believed to be the skull of a Warrah at Spring Point last year, archaeologists Dr Rob Philpott and Dr David Barker are in the Islands to carry out further investigation of the site.

Drs Philpott and Barker, have been coming to the Falklands regularly since 1992, studying the early archaeological sites in the Islands, from Port Egmont and Port Louis to Keppel Island and the early FIC settlements.

Their visit this time to explore the site of last year's discovery for the Museum & National Trust, is with the assistance of a grant from the Shackleton Scholarship Fund.

The Warrah, the only Falkland

Islands land mammal, was once very common in the Islands and also very tame, a feature which led to its eradication over 160 years ago.

Only six specimens of the animal exist in European museums and the remains found by Dale Evans are the only ones belonging to an animal thought to have died naturally.

In a talk at the Chamber of Commerce next Thursday (March 3rd) Dr Philpott will give an overview of archaeology in the Falklands, explaining how he and his colleague undertake survey work, mapping the archaeological remains and using documents to make sense of the physical remains.

JENNY Luxton of Sea Lion Lodge reports that some 2000 of the King cormorants whose nests were devastated by storms some weeks ago have re-grouped and re-built nests about a quarter of a mile West South West and now have fledgling chicks. Also contrary to reports of a complete wipe-out of rockhopper penguins from the same site, two chicks have survived and appear to be healthy.

New Rockie

ROCKHOPPER Exploration have begun drilling an appraisal well 2.3km from the Sea Lion well drilled last September which was found to contain commercially viable quantities of hydrocarbons. The company will take about 38 days to drill to a depth of 3,000 m to investigate the possible existence of deeper oil-bearing sands than those found in the Sea Lion well.

Cathedral call

AMONG the many casualties of the recent severe earthquake in Christchurch New Zealand was the tower of the cathedral of the same name. The Reverend Richard Hines sent a brief message of condolence from Christchurch Cathedral in Stanley to the Reverend Peter J. Beck, Dean of Christchurch Cathedral in New Zealand.

Really a record

ALONG with youngsters from the UK, USA, Nigeria and Uganda, children from the Falkland Islands Infant and Junior School, MPA School and Goose Green School are now recognised world record holders after being among more than 102,000 students across the globe to take part in this month's charity signing event.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

A TELECONFERENCE with representatives from South Atlantic Overseas Territories was a diversion, albeit a technically fraught one, from normal business. We have recognised for years that we have some common interests and problems. The aim of the meeting was to identify and prioritise a few areas on which to start work.

I did not make the government restructure a big part of my election manifesto, merely commenting on the loss of some corporate memory, doubting whether predicted savings would be made and confirming from published papers that every detail had gone to Executive Council for approval. I was under no illusion that all was well under the old structure. Pre-election there was clear evidence of management problems in the secondary school and the hospital to name just two areas of which I have some knowledge. No-one can honestly claim that FIG was running like a well oiled machine then, or that it is now. Any structure is reliant on all the individuals manning it at every level. Just one weak link in the chain of responsibility can hinder and stall work and progress no matter how well everyone else is working. A two year review has merit but will not be the answer to all our problems. It cannot affect existing contracts and may have an unsettling effect on some of the very good people we have working for us. I take the, some would say, simplistic view that less time measuring and ticking boxes and more time devoted to getting on with the job would benefit all.

The MLA/officer groups working on the various pressing practical and political issues which concern us all have reported progress and are due to present firm proposals in the next few weeks. Some actions are already underway. I wish I could say more, but at this stage I think it better if you approach your representatives off the record. I do not think we help ourselves as a country by 'going public' too soon or by knee jerk reactions to every Argentine threat. I've no intention of allowing them to lead our policies.


Red faces in Argentina over red duster oil ships

ARGENTINA'S planned exploration for hydrocarbons off Tierra del Fuego by the Repsol-YPF companies has suffered a major public relations setback.

This followed a revelation in the Buenos Aires press that the two vessels contracted for the job not only are British flagged but also have links with the current oil exploration round in Falkland Islands' waters.

When a few weeks ago the Spanish company Repsol with the former Argentine nationalised oil company YPF announced its intentions to drill, it came as no surprise for the industry that the Spanish corporation would contract the Stena Drillmax deep water drilling vessel as it had done off the coast of Brazil.

The Stena Drill Max is the world's largest drill ship, with a displacement of 97,000 tonnes, an overall length of 228m and breadth of 42m. Capable of drilling to a depth of 11,000m, it was built by Samsung Heavy Industries Co Ltd

in Korea, and has been designed to operate in harsh environments such as the Norwegian and Barents Seas.

The catch for the Argentine government which recently put in place measures to punish shipping companies connected with oil exploration around the Falklands is that the Stena DrillMax belongs to an Aberdeen company of the same, which is one of the leaders in the industry for this kind of task. Similarly the Isle of Man-flagged support vessel, Normand Baltic belongs to the Norwegian company Solstad Offshore ASA, which according to the Argentine

press is also involved in Falklands' oil exploration logistics activities.

The two vessels have called into Mar del Plata where the claims first surfaced.

In an article published on Sunday in Buenos Aires main daily Clarin, former Congress member Mario Cafiero published a column asking President Cristina Fernandez de Kirchner if "this is how we are de-

fending our sovereignty?"

The quote paraphrases last week's controversy with Washington over the seizure of the cargo of a US Air Force cargo plane when Mrs Kirchner, during a political rally, called on all Argentines to defend the country's sovereignty.

Cafiero asked how is it possible if the Argentine government alleges it has taken all the necessary maritime controls regarding vessels involved in the current Falkland Islands exploration round that these two vessels flying the red ensign managed to arrive in Mar del Plata.

DNA proves gentoos may be more mobile than previously thought

RESEARCH into penguin DNA which we reported on last year (PN May 21) has produced some interesting results regarding the mobility of the Falkland Islands population of gentoo penguins.

Back in May, Hila Levy from Oxford University and Tom Hart from the Institute of Zoology in London, were in the Falklands visiting gentoo penguin colonies, not to catch, tag or otherwise molest the birds, but to pick up Tom Hart and colleague Hila Levy gathering feathers

information about gentoo population structures and movements.

It appears that contrary to the popular belief that gentoos always return to the same colony, there is a considerable amount of movement between colonies within the Islands. Tom cited as an example the gentoo colony at Shallow Harbour which was decimated by a red tide incident five years ago, but was slowly filling up again with gentoos from surrounding colonies.

One negative aspect of this unexpected mobility may be the spread of disease over time, but this is possibly compensated for by the fact that a decimated colony can be supported in its recovery by penguins from other areas.

The great advantage of this type of research is that it involves identification without molestation and can be carried out using feathers gathered from around colonies at any time of year.

With his methodology developed and working, Tom is interested in extending the work done on gentoos to rockhoppers, whose populations are regarded as more threatened.

Q WHAT is the policy on government housing rental to persons who have recently owned or part owned property?

The following answer is as is laid out in the Management Code...

A PRIORITIES for the allocation of Government Housing and eligibility for addition to the "List of Applications for Government Housing" are as follows...

For the purposes of this policy section 'resident' is defined as people with Falkland Islands Status or those holding a Permanent Residence Permit (PRP). However Executive Council agreed on 22 September 2005 (paper 236/05 refers) that as applicants for permanent residence are required to demonstrate they have long-term accommodation arrangements in place before a PRP is granted, then unless there are extenuating circumstances a PRP holder will not be accepted onto the Government Housing List for a period of four years from the date of the permit.

Priority One is FIG contract personnel recruited/seconded from overseas, who by the nature of their employment conditions are entitled to, and must be provided with, accommodation for the duration of their contract of service.

Priority Two is for those who have special needs. For the avoidance of doubt, 'special needs' refers to an applicant whose housing need is particularly acute due to additional factors which may include, but are not restricted to, disability, ill-health or dependant children. Residents with special needs may not be required to satisfy all the criteria in Priority Three below.

Priority Three is for residents in the Falkland Islands, or who are normally resident but are temporarily absent overseas on education or training for medical reasons who are serving in HM Armed Forces, or who are resident overseas but are intending to return to the Islands within the next 12 months.

Eligibility for priority three requires them not to be property (home) owners in the Falkland Islands or overseas. They have not sold a property (home) within 12 months of date of application and are not on the Government debtors list. They do not have the financial means to buy or build a house or rent privately in the private sector and are over the age of 18.

Q WE have had a number of tourism directors in the past, I would like to ask the newly established director this question... You have been away on behalf of Falkland tourism to tell the world what we have to offer here, but how many tour destinations of the Falklands has he seen?

The answer to this and the following question were from Paul Trowell Director of Falkland Islands Tourist Board...

A I ACTUALLY started my position by visiting Sea Trade in Miami in March 2010, even before coming to the Falkland Islands. Since then I have been to the UK on transit to the IAATO conference in Turin Italy in June in which I had various meetings with our contract public relations company and media representatives with the outcome of getting high profile media to visit the Falkland Islands.

Whilst being in the UK I also had meetings with FITB's research company. In October I was in the USA meeting key trade contacts to raise the profile of the Falkland Islands with the long term outcome of getting more brochures/media content on the Falkland Islands and more travel sellers featuring the destination.

In regards to your second part of the question I arrived at the beginning of winter and managed to get to Sea Lion Island and have since been to Carcass Island and Bleaker whilst spending most of my weekends exploring the East Island and the key tourism destinations. I have booked a week on the West in the next three weeks and intend to explore as much as I can in that week. In the New Year the office has a plan to get out and refresh the staff with the destination as budget and time allows.

As the General Manager of FITB it is impossible to get to all destinations and I rely on my key staff, who are locals, to provide me with informed and factual insights about destinations within the Falkland Islands.

Q WE do seem to have a wealth of experienced people coming down but they in turn bring experts down to tell us on how we can do it better. My second question is... We should surely have the expert here as the director of FITB, so why bring another person in to give us numbers we already know?

A I am confused about this question regarding "expert coming down on promotion" FITB has both PR agencies, Keene PR, who represent our interests in the UK and Robertson Solutions, who represent our interest in North America.

FITB have been investing in these PR representatives for some time and FITB believe it is essential for us to get them to have first-hand product knowledge of the

destination they are contracted to promote.

We also have invited Acorn Tourism Research to visit in the New Year for training on the Tourism Satellite account software and statistical analysis.

This is essential for future forecasting and measurement of tourism contribution to the Falkland Islands economy. Without this analysis we would not be able to go to government with facts on tourism contribution and forecasts to seek future funding for tourism growth.

All of the above are not charging FITB for their time and we are only covering flight costs. In an ideal world most National Tourism Organisations would have their own PR and Research departments so FITB rely heavily on external organisations to provide this resource and I believe in the long term this should be brought in-house as budgets and skill levels grow in the organisation.

Q AT the time that the CE's contract was renewed after the initial 3 year contract period, have the terms of the contract for the

following 2 years remained the same as for the original 3 years or were they re-negotiated to provide an increased level of remuneration?"

The reason I ask this is because there appears to be a freeze on the salaries of most employees within FIG, but there is a perception that contract officers take the opportunity of increasing their salary package when they renew or extend their contract.

I would like to know whether this was the case when the CE extended his initial contract?

The following answer was provided by Carolyn Montgomery Head of Human Resources...

A THE Chief Executive originally received a contract which covered the period from 3rd January 2008 to 2nd January 2011 at a fixed rate i.e. no additional pay rises were applied during this period therefore he did not benefit during this contract period from any pay rise.

Other FIG employees had a 2.5 per cent pay rise in October 2008, backdated to 1st July 2008 and a 1 per cent pay rise on 1st July 2010.

The Chief Executive's salary was increased by 1 per cent as a cost of living rise with effect from the new contract only i.e. 3rd Jan 2011.

Technically therefore over the entire period of his employment the Chief Executive has received a lesser percentage pay rise compared to other FIG employees.

IN the Falklands last week were two veterinary inspectors from the European Commission (EU): Hungarian Agnes Kerti, who is based in Dublin and Andre Evers, who commutes to Brussels from his home in Belgium.

Working with FIG's veterinary officers and the local 'competent authorities' Steve Pointing and Zoe Luxton, the two EU officers have been evaluating all aspects of the

licensing of meat for export in the Falkland Islands. This work has involved visits to farms and the Agricultural Department's laboratory as well as to the abattoir.

The result of the visit will be a report which will be presented to the local authorities for comment before being presented to the EU's Health and Consumer Protection Directorate, who will decide whether any action is required.





Running like the wind and against it

THE annual Cape Pembroke half-marathon held on Sunday proved once again that it is not a race for the faint-hearted, though it attracted 64 runners, including a five part childrens' relay team and 15 walkers, which was considered by organisers Fran and Peter Biggs to be a good field.

The thirteen and a bit miles is run over a variety of different surfaces from tarmac to mud, going through the whole gamut of possibilities in

between: loose gravel, deep sand, ankle-twisting rocks and grass.

This being the Falklands, and the summer, weather conditions for the race have often been less than ideal. Last year's race was run in icy rain, but this year by contrast a strong sun was out, which would have baked the runners had it not been for the cooling effect of a ferocious wind.

Starting off rather northerly but swinging westwards as the race pro-

gressed, the wind, estimated at between 25 and 40 knots gave the runners a bit of a lift on their first stretch from the start down to Surf Bay, but then began to attack them on the climb up to the airport, whipping sand in their eyes before attacking them again during the long haul back from the Lighthouse to the turn-off to FIPASS.

In consequence of this possibly, the time of this year's winner, Hong Kong-born Nepalese Nirmal Rana of

the Parachute Regiment was over a quarter of an hour slower than the record set by last year's winner, Steve Frear of the RAF.

If the times of the first and second mens' runners were somewhat slower than usual, the competition between them was fierce with Rex Eagle pushing hard over the final miles to come home just 22 seconds behind the winner.

This magnificent effort gained

Rex the coveted wooden lighthouse which is awarded each year to the first Falkland Islands resident home.

Second Falklands resident home was KEMH pharmacist, Juan Suarez, a veteran of last year's full marathon. Third was first-time entrant Governor Nigel Haywood, who may be the first governor to run the race, though Governor Richard Ralph walked it some years ago.

When last year's womens' winner

Teslyn Barkman retired from the race at the half-way mark with compounded injuries, she was already behind this year's fastest female, RAF Flight Sergeant Harrie Allerston.

Fastest walker was Gina Smith, who led the fifteen-strong walkers' field from the start and had the distinction of breaking the finishing tape before any of the runners, possibly the first time that this has happened.

**Department of Agriculture Wool Market Report
18th February, 2011**

Tony Mills, Department of Agriculture, Falkland Islands.
The Australian wool market is showing signs of a little volatility. In Australian dollar (AUD) terms the BMI closed before bouncing back to 1342 cents. I cut off the previous week. Exchange rate volatility is masking the underlying price trend as the AUD depreciated against the pound to finish at \$1.62 per £. This has the effect of showing price decreases across all micron categories after converting from AUD to pounds when in fact the majority of categories show an increase. Chinese buyers are still dominant however good competition is being seen from Indian and Taiwanese buyers as well as Europeans especially in the mid micron categories (19.5 - 21.5). The competition for finer wools is flowing through to higher prices for broader wools such as 25 - 30 microns. A larger offering is expected next week and I'm sure this will test the resilience of the market.

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




