Strongest signals yet that William will tour Islands

THE prospect of Prince William joining next year's Liberation celebrations in the Falklands is firming up as a real possibility following feverish media reports spreading out from the UK.

Speculation that the newly married prince will be posted to the Falklands was this week splashed across the UK tabloids and – significantly – repeated across the world's media.

RAF Search and Rescue pilot William, 28, who married 29-year-old Kate Middleton on Friday, is said to be lined up for a ten-week posting at Mount Pleasant.

William, known as flight lieutenant Wales to his colleagues in 22 Squadron at RAF Valley in north Wales, where he currently serves, is keen to be promoted from co-pilot to pilot, putting him in charge of a Sea King helicopter.

And, while a posting to the Falklands has long been mooted, it has never before earned so much global coverage.

The Sun broke the news on Monday, claiming he would be here in September, but that Kate –

now the Duchess of Cambridge – would not be allowed to share quarters with him.

Under a headline proclaiming "Falklands crisis for new wife Kate," The Sun said a September posting "could not have come at a worse time for the couple, who will only be a few months into married life."

An unnamed source said: "It is a bitter blow for Kate. They have known about the Falklands for several weeks, but Kate was very upset when she first heard."

"It is an awful way to start married life, especially hard because it destroys the first magic of being together."

"William could probably pull some strings and get out of going, but he is determined to be treated like any other search and rescue pilot."

As other media followed up the story, it appeared there was more than a grain of truth to The Sun's

scoop – although 2012 now seems the more likely date. The Daily Mail ran a similar story to The Sun, but also quoted a spokesperson for Clarence House saying it was unlikely William would be posted abroad this year.

Press reports later in the week suggested his posting might take place next year – coinciding with the Queen's Diamond Jubilee and – most pertinently for the Falklands – the 30th anniversary of Liberation.

According to The Times, St James's Palace confirmed William would be sent to the South Atlantic for ten weeks, but it added: "The posting would not be as soon as September, contrary to reports. Royal sources said that it would not be before early 2012."

William will be expected to attend the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Day on June 5 – a public holiday in the UK – which could preempt another wave of patriotism

if he were to fly to the Falklands a week later. And the significance of a high-profile royal taking part in such a landmark anniversary of the end of the 1982 war with Argentina also would not be lost in diplomatic circles.

As is normal protocol, a Ministry of Defence spokesman said: "We don't confirm where service personnel are being deployed."

Reports of a potential posting to the Falklands for William have circulated several times over recent years, often with references to his uncle, Prince Andrew, who served as a helicopter pilot in the Falklands War.

As the latest speculation continued to spread across the globe, one of the Falklands MLAs found herself being quoted in the San Francisco Sentinel.

The newspaper, which carries the strapline "Challah Is Gayly Taken" beneath its masthead, reported: "Cllr Jan Cheek, a member of the Falkland Islands Government, said the Prince would be 'more than welcome'."

Fines to reflect realistic sums

FINES for road traffic offences are to be increased from May 15.

Much of our road traffic legislation dates back to the original introduction of the present Road Traffic Ordinance in 1948, or to the adoption of the Road Traffic (Provisional) Regulations Order in 1986.

A new road traffic ordinance has been under review for more than four years.

However, in a paper put before Executive Council last week, Inspector Len McGill said although there had been amendments to the road traffic legislation, the maximum penalty for many road traffic offences was based on set amounts determined some years ago, and many of these did not reflect changes in the value of money since then. Several date all the way back to 1948 and one of these fines is as low as £2.

Insp McGill said a number of road traffic offences were punishable by imprisonment and/or a fine but, in some cases, the maximum fine was relatively modest.

As an example, article 20 of the Road Traffic (Provisional) Regulations Order provides that the maximum penalty for certain offences is imprisonment for up to three months and/or a £200 fine.

He said: "If anything, it is even worse for the maximum fine to be

so low when coupled with the possibility of imprisonment: the court has little scope to impose a sentence in the middle ground between a trivial fine and a community or custodial sentence."

It also had become increasingly apparent that enforcement of road traffic legislation was being hindered because prosecutions for less serious offences against the Road Traffic Ordinance could not be justified by the low level of the fine likely to be imposed, said Insp McGill.

"The likelihood that prosecutions will not be able to be brought reduces the effectiveness and deterrent effect of the legislation, as persons who commit these offences are not prosecuted and become aware that they are unlikely to be prosecuted, even if they continue to offend," he said. "Even if they are prosecuted, the penalty is likely to be trivial."

As a result of a review with the Attorney General's Chambers, it was decided not to just increase the existing fines in line with inflation but to take a "back to basics" approach, assessing the seriousness of each offence in the light of modern conditions and values. The scale of fines has been reviewed and the Governor has been recommended to make the appropriate order.

Accidental death verdict

HER Majesty's Coroner John Trevaskis has found the death of Mr Keith James Bonner (56), of 4 Felton Court, to be accidental.

Mr Bonner was found dead near his bed by his wife in the early hours of March 5, after she had finished taxi driving.

The court heard from statements that Mr Bonner had been suffering with flu for several weeks and, on attending the hospital to be told that he was not ill enough

to be treated, he had self-medicated with LemSips and capsules before turning to alcohol, eventually drinking up to one bottle of whisky a day.

He stopped taking his prescribed medication for a heart condition, high blood pressure and cholesterol during this time.

Mr Trevaskis said there were no suspicious circumstances and Mr Bonner's death had been a combination of natural causes.

Glenn bows out to chorus of praise: but who's next?

TWO members of the previous Legislative Assembly are considering standing again in the wake of the resignation last week of Glenn Ross.

Mike Summers, who lost out on re-election when he polled 50 votes fewer than Jan Cheek, and John Birmingham, who was eighth in the Stanley count, both told the Penguin News they may attempt to reclaim their seats.

"I have not yet made any decision on whether to stand for election in the by-election, and will discuss further with family and friends before reaching a conclusion," said Mr Summers. "I would need to be convinced that were I elected I could work productively with the current Members, and that is far from clear at this time."

Mr Birmingham said it was "too early to say" if he would definitely stand, but he was considering it.

Former Stanley councillor Janet Robertson denied she would contest the vacant seat, and Andrea Clausen was overseas and unavailable for comment.

The resignation of Mr Ross – who held the portfolios for Agriculture, Falkland Landholdings and Fox Bay and the Falkland Islands Meat Company – was announced on Friday. He said increasing work commitments, as manager of the Power and Electrical Department, had left him with no choice but to

stand down. Mr Ross told the Penguin News he thought he'd had two of the best jobs going and, for the most part, he had managed to juggle both. But, he said: "If there was a clash, I would put the Power Station first."

Equipment failures and the commissioning of replacement machinery had led to a high workload: "This is a tense and vulnerable time for us and my focus is entirely on the Power Station."

Mr Ross said he had enjoyed being on council and was "fed up that it has come to an unscheduled end and so soon." He thanked people he had worked with and said he hoped to see some "fresh faces" vying for his seat.

"I now know I am much better at dealing with angry people than nice comments. Even people I had run-ins with have written. The farmers have been brilliant to me and whoever comes in has a really good portfolio to pick up."

Fellow Assembly Member Dick Sawle said he was "very sorry to see Glenn go."

Glenn had put a lot of good work into the Assembly, he said. "But I do also appreciate the fact that it's very difficult for anybody to hold down a full-time job and do this particular job. I have every admiration for people who can manage to do that, and I wish any prospective candidate the very best."

For the period leading up to the by-election – which must take place before July 7 – Cllr Bill Luxton will take responsibility for Agriculture, FLH/Fox Bay, FIMCo and the FIMCo Livestock working group.

Governor Nigel Haywood said he accepted Mr Ross's resignation with "great reluctance" and thanked him for his work.

"I would like to put on record my appreciation for the commitment you have shown to the role of MLA, both in general and in your farming and agriculture portfolio," he said.

"I have particularly valued your advice since your election to ExCo at the end of last year. I will greatly miss your input."

"I wish you all the very best for the future, and hope that circumstances might allow you once again to stand for election to the Legislative Assembly."

Clyde remains

THE patrol ship HMS Clyde will remain in the South Atlantic to protect the Falklands Islands until at least 2018, following a six-year contract extension with BAE Systems to deliver support services to the ship. HMS Clyde has been deployed as the offshore patrol vessel for the Royal Navy's Fishery Protection Squadron since 2007.

Fearless vets

A GROUP of veterans from HMS Fearless will be presenting a talk about the war at the FIDF Hall from 6pm on Monday. They also will be rededicating a memorial at Bertha's Beach at 1.30pm on Tuesday to the six sailors and Royal Marines who lost their lives when their landing craft was sunk. All are welcome to attend.

Second chance

CHIEF Superintendent Barry Marsden was on Monday sworn in as interim Chief Police Officer, while the government seeks a longer-term replacement for Gary Finchett. Chief Supt Marsden had applied for the Director of Community Safety position at the same time as Mr Finchett, about 18 months ago.

EOD find ammo

THE Joint Service Explosive Ordnance Disposal (JSEOD) team, now based at MPA, has recovered 300-500 machine gun and heavy machine gun rounds discovered at Mt Tumbledown. The ammunition find from 1982 had been reported to police.

Taylor tribute

GOOSE Green residents gathered to pay tribute to Lieutenant Nicholas Taylor at a service of remembrance on Sunday. Lt Taylor (32) was killed in action over Goose Green on May 4 1982.

Stanley heli-ops

EXCO has approved in principle the use of Stanley Airport as a base for helicopter operations with a lease and associated arrangements still to be finalised.

Searching for CMO

THE search for a Chief Medical Officer continues with the most recent candidate who travelled to the Islands not having worked out, yesterday's meeting of the Health and Medical Services Committee heard. A decision on the best way forward was to be made later.

The Penguin News asked Cllr Jan Cheek if it was true that a person who had been interviewed by three FIG officers in the UK for the CMO post, had then visited the Islands only to find he lacked the necessary qualifications. Cllr Cheek said she was confident no-one would have been shortlisted unless they were appropriately qualified and experienced. The candidate had been interviewed by phone, she said. Costs for direct recruitment so far this financial year have reached £175,400 and do not include a portion of travel costs for interviewers. Interviews are normally arranged for dates when interviewers are overseas for other purposes.

Oil companies make progress in the north

ROCKHOPPER Exploration this week spudded a fresh appraisal well to gain a more accurate picture of its Sea Lion discovery in the North Falkland Basin.

Drilling began on Sunday and is expected to take 38 days.

The latest probe follows an appraisal drilled in March, since when the company has estimated Sea Lion's recoverable oil reserves to a lowest-case figure of 155 million barrels, and deemed the find to be of commercial significance.

Meanwhile, Argos Resources this week moved a step closer towards its drilling campaign after submitting an Environmental Impact Study (EIS) to the Falkland Islands Government.

The EIS assesses the potential impact of exploration drilling on the environment within the licence acreage, adjacent to Rockhopper's Sea Lion field, and along the adjacent coastlines.

FIG will now carry out a statutory 42-day period of public consultation. Argos chairman Ian

Thompson, who plans to visit the Islands later this month, said approval of the EIS would take the company a step closer towards being ready for drilling operations in the fourth quarter of 2011 or early 2012. He said the group was excited about the potential of its Falklands acreage and it confirmed it would require more cash to drill the area.

Despite battling with poor weather, the seismic survey vessels Polarcus Nadia and Polarcus Asima, working on behalf of Argos, are set to finish at the end of May. Director of Mineral Resources Phyl Rendell said the data acquired to date had been of excellent quality, but the vessels were not anxious to be operating in the area during June.

The Argos Production Licence PL001 covers an area of approximately 1,126 square kilometres.

Desire Petroleum directors Eddie Wisniewski and Ken Black have said they also will be visiting the Islands this week.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

THE resignation of our respected colleague Glenn Ross has further highlighted the conflicts arising for civil servants elected to the Assembly. No-one wishes to reduce the already limited pool of public spirited individuals willing to stand for election. However, while not yet a full time commitment, the workload of Assembly members can entail the equivalent of at least three days a week. This includes not just formal and informal meetings but also reading vast amounts of paperwork, dealing with constituents' problems and queries and fact-finding visits to unfamiliar sectors, for example FIMCo. To cover overseas meetings all members must be prepared to travel once or twice annually. Additionally the role includes social obligations, for example with visiting journalists and FCO officials. It is essential that people meet the elected representatives of Islanders and not just officials. Some weeks are even busier, for example at budget time.

IT is fair to assume that most civil service posts are full-time commitments and therefore some system is needed if all but the most senior managers are going to be able to stand and, if elected, be able to undertake all the duties of an MLA. I have suggested that civil servants be allowed leave of absence for the duration of their term. This would require the provision of adequate cover so would come at a cost, but would guarantee employment at the end of their time on the Assembly.

EXACTLY the same applies to private sector employees. Both large and small companies struggle to provide cover for key employees. Some individuals may be prepared to risk resignation and organise their affairs accordingly, but that is not an option for everyone. A solution is needed, otherwise we could reach a situation where only the retired, self-employed or unemployed feel able to stand.

FINALLY I'd like to place on record praise for Glenn who juggled his responsibilities as long as he could before being forced by a series of generator failures to make his day job his priority. He brought new ideas, enthusiasm and a great sense of humour to his work.

Trialers greeted with a fierce blow in the face

IN complete contrast to the Goose Green sports dog trials when spectators and handlers languished in the sun, the champion trialers at North Arm were faced with cold howling wind and hailstones as they struggled to communicate with their dogs.

Sponsored by the Falkland Islands Company, the Champion Sheep Dog Trials bring the top dogs from East and West Falkland together to compete once a year.

North Arm's assistant manager Steven Dickson along with his bitch Mae worked their way to victory in what were very trying conditions with an impressive run displaying a very high standard of command and style. He effortlessly guided the five sheep through wind and weather, a set of hurdles and into a six foot square pen to earn the top score of 126.5 points from the three judges.

Susan Hirtle had three dogs in the trials and earned second and third place with Toto and Jodie respectively. Toto and Susan set

the standard as the second pair out, and it looked as if they would be hard to beat as the gate slammed shut on the sheep after just 6.58 minutes of the allocated 12 minutes earning 110 points.

Particularly impressive was the close work between Susan and her dogs through the hurdles and around the pen. This was mirrored in her husband Tony's work as he penned the five sheep in just 7.09 minutes to earn fourth place with 100.5 points, a good indication of the close work the couple carry

out when working and loading sheep around boats on their small West Island farm of Golding.

Susan's third place dog Jodie is an old hand at dog trials and worked determinedly to pen the sheep with just seconds to spare notching up 105.5 points.

First out on Saturday was Les Morrison who has earned the title of champion dog handler no fewer than 17 times since 1970. But Les and his elderly dog Khan were out of luck this year as they struggled to communicate in the adverse weather conditions.

All handlers were given the option to call off should the weather worsen, but the hardy farming types soldiered on for the full 12 minutes, apart from Hew Grierson with Cop, who weren't seeing eye to eye on the day and called off four minutes into the run, and Steven Dickson with his second dog Jeff, which took a fancy to the warm looking Land Rover at the letting out pen and was loath to leave it.

Super head contracts queried

WITH one FIG "super head" having left before the conclusion of his original contract term, and another due to leave two years into his three-year contract, the financial implications of their early departure have been queried.

Director of Community Safety Gary Finchett left for personal reasons earlier this year, and Director of Procurement and Efficiency, Andrew Lee, is due to leave in September.

This prompted a question to councillors at last week's public meeting from Ruth Taylor, who

asked whether the officers concerned received their full entitlement of end of contract gratuity, or whether it was worked out on a pro-rata basis.

Councillor Emma Edwards said unless there was good reason to withhold all or part of it, the gratuity would be pro-rated to the period in post. However, if a three-year contract was reduced to two, it was possible full contract allowances would be paid as if it were a two-year contract initially.

She added: "Flight allowances may be reclaimed for that year and

for relocation grant reclaimed, as allowed for in the contract. It will depend upon the circumstances of the situation as to whether or not the allowances and/or relocation grant is reclaimed or gratuity paid.

"The Chief Executive will make a decision in each case, taking advice from the Attorney General/Head of Human Resources as appropriate. The salary grades for posts are published in the Budget Book but individuals' contract details (and salaries within them) are confidential, as is normal for any other employee."

Diesel rockets up 10p

THE price of diesel has rocketed by 10p – representing a hefty 44 per cent increase over the past 12 months.

Stanley Services announced the price rises at the weekend. Diesel is up to 72p per litre, kerosene is up by 5p to 73p, and petrol by 3p to 94p.

Global fuel prices are blamed for the increase, which could have been worse if the pound was not currently so firm in trading against the US dollar.

Councillor Dick Sawle, who sits on the Stanley Services board on behalf of the Government, said Stanley Services had tried to keep increases down, but he conceded

this one was "huge" and he added: "Unfortunately there is nothing we can do about it."

Cllr Sawle said it was too early to estimate how the price rise would affect government budget discussions, but it would clearly have an inflationary effect, and inflation is one of the worries we have got," he told local radio. "We are seeing in the Falklands now, the recession is starting to hit us now a little bit later than it has the rest of the world. It's not good news at all."

Fuel prices are set by a formula agreed between Stanley Services and FIG.

Indifference costs dearly

A MOTORIST who admitted he "couldn't be bothered" to register ownership of his vehicle has been ordered to pay a total of £144.25 in fines and costs.

The Magistrate's Court heard on Wednesday that Shane Leon Mitchell (20) had been given a verbal warning on February 11 for not registering his Land Rover, and was later given a deadline of seven days to pay on March 22, which he failed to meet. Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis fined him £20 plus costs of £85 on top of the £39.25 fee.

SAMA boss pleads for unused holiday credits

DONATIONS of unused holiday credits could help bring more 1982 veterans and their relatives to the Islands – but time is running out to sign them over.

SAMA82 Chairman Gary Clement has asked that those people who have holiday credits they are not likely to use to sign them over to the charity: "Other than using them for travel, it is the only way to get 100 per cent of your credits," he said. "If you don't use them, you lose them."

There are some veterans coming to the Islands in June 2012, and fundraising is underway in the UK for a pilgrimage of 50 to coincide with Armistice Day in November.

But, said Mr Clement, there was no reason why a further pilgrimage could not be organised later in the year if funds were available.

"Another £60,000-£70,000 could bring another pilgrimage of 50," he said. "Next year is the 30th anniversary of the war, and there may not be any more big pilgrimages until the 50th anniversary."

He said the target number need not extend to 50, but it would be a fitting and generous way to use unclaimed holiday credits.

ExCo agreed in 2002 that holiday credits could be signed over to SAMA82 to assist with travel for veterans and their families. With the scheme coming to an end next month, the government will reclaim any unspent funds, which amounted to £920,000 at the beginning of the financial year.

But he was quick to pay tribute to the many people who had helped him achieve his award.

"I know that over the years many local people have helped me achieve this honour and I would now like to thank everyone that has helped me, SAMA FI and the veterans of 1982 in any small, or in some cases very large way.

"Please don't stop helping, as more and more visitors are coming our way and they leave all the better for visiting these Islands under peaceful circumstances."

Councillors admit government broke its own recruitment law

APPARENT flouting of its own laws by government was admitted by councillors at last Tuesday's public meeting, in response to questions from Phil Middleton.

Current immigration legislation – which requires all jobs to be advertised locally and preference to be given to suitably qualified local candidates – has often been regarded as limiting the power of employers in the private sector to choose their preferred candidates for posts on offer.

Now it appears that in the case of two recent senior appointments, this procedure has not been followed by FIG.

Mr Middleton pointed out that in the case of the first, but later aborted attempt to recruit a head teacher for the Community School, and in the more recent recruitment for a temporary Head of Public Safety, neither post had first been advertised locally.

When doubts were expressed whether the latter post, being an appointment of the Governor, was necessarily subject to the same regulations, Mr Middleton suggested that as it had now been expanded to include responsibility for the Fire Service and the Defence Force it should be regarded as just another FIG post.

Councillors confirmed, however, that despite the inclusion of wider responsibilities for public safety, the holder of the post had to be a police officer.

Councillor Emma Edwards said while councillors were involved in deciding which posts should be funded, they had "no say" over who was appointed.

Cllr Dick Sawle said while it appeared a breach of the law and government policy had taken place, he had "no idea" why this should have happened. Mr Middleton retorted that it seemed very few people

were involved in recruitment for government and they did not "abide by policy."

Councillors told the meeting that the appointment of a new Head of Public Safety was a temporary one, pending a forthcoming review of the Civil Service.

The suggestion that temporary posts should be excluded from the rigours of the law led Tim Miller to suggest that if he had a sudden need for temporary staff he would be able to employ whomever he wanted, and the Immigration Department would be happy to issue them with work permits.

But, on being assured that this would not be the case, Mr Miller suggested that different rules were being applied for different people, a claim supported by Brian Summers, who told the meeting that the Immigration Ordinance was specific in requiring a separate work permit for every job.

Coming clean on fleece prices

I WOULD like to respond to an article in the Penguin News (April 20) headlined "Farmers on a high price roll."

In the article I believe Mr Hall had to have been misquoted.

I am sure he may have sold some 25 micron wool at the stated £6.40 per kilo clean.

Mr Hall also made offers in the early part of the season for 25 micron wool in the region of £4.45.

At the time these were good offers compared to last season's prices, and I would be very surprised if no farmers took these up.

The author of the hypothetical farm stated that a flock of 7,000 25 micron sheep with a fleece weight of 3.5 kilos (above Falkland average) would pocket £200,000 gross.

To put the record straight, the figures offered in this article were based on a clean price per kilo for a greasy product, hence the exaggerated projected income.

Based on Mr Hall's price for the 25 range with a flock of 7,000 and a fleece weight of 3.5 kilos greasy, here is a more realistic gross income that this farm could produce: 7,000 sheep x 3.5 kilos greasy fleece weight = 24,500 kilos greasy @ 65% yield = 15,925 clean kilos or 2.27 kilos clean per fleece x £6.40 = £101,940, not £200,000 as stated.

This is an average of £14.56, not £22 per fleece.

A more realistic seasonal income for this hypothetical scenario would be a price range of £4.50 to £5.30 for the 25 micron wool, bringing this farm's income more like 3.5 x 65% Y = 2.27 cfw x £4.50 pence per kilo = £10.21 per fleece, or: 3.5 x 65% Y = 2.27 cfw x £5.30 pence per kilo = £12.03 per fleece; hence between £71,470 and £84,210.

£11,000 of this will go straight out to shearing and freight of the wool before any other running or living costs.

I do not doubt that some farms have managed to achieve top prices, but many have sold at differing times of the season (as we did), hence the price difference.

In my view misinformation like this only widens the divide between our communities.

Fairy tales and the power of ideas

A DAY or so ago, when thinking about this column, I decided I would not write about the royal wedding.

After all, an estimated two billion people around the world watched the event, and about 3,000 of them were in the Falklands. It was bound to be a bit worn out.

But it's so tempting. This morning, as I emerged late into bank holiday Monday consciousness, I thought idly about a few of the stranger aspects of the wedding, such as the apparently random invitation list - the Beckhams were there, but the two most recent prime ministers were not.

And I wondered whether women had been told to wear absurd hats (the best example of which was a pair of antlers, worn without a hint of shame by Prince Andrew's daughter Beatrice).

And what about Pippa Middleton's bottom? That stuck in the mind too.

I was jolted into full consciousness by the news that arrived with my tea and Coco Pops. Osama bin Laden had been killed. I had to think for a good five seconds. Who was this bin Laden fellow whose body had been aerated with M16 rounds and then, very strangely, dumped in the Arabian Gulf?

It was a little thick of me, even on a bank holiday Monday morning. I accept that. But it's been almost ten years since he orchestrated the most outrageous terror attack in history, and since then he had been rendered fairly irrelevant as we and the US drove Al Qaeda out of Afghanistan, and

American remotely-piloted drones picked off most other senior AQ operatives.

George Bush had long since stopped bragging that bin Laden would be taken "dead or alive," and we had been encouraged to consider him pretty irrelevant.

Well, this morning we discovered that the Americans still cared about him very much, and most were delighted that he was dead. They celebrated victory, but if that is what it is, it is a pyrrhic one.

The truth is that bin Laden had not been an effective planner and commander of terror attacks for a long time. He had, however, become a legend; an idea. But even

as that, he was becoming less potent.

His fortunes changed this morning. When Washington announced his death, and the very curious fact that his remains had been almost immediately dumped at sea, bin Laden was rehabilitated as an inspirational martyr and hero for millions. He is now fundamentalist Islam's Che Guevara.

His image as the man who changed the course of history will be burnished, and his call to arms is now louder than it was when he was alive. As a legend and an idea, he is more dangerous than ever. It was not surprising that conspiracy theories were hatched on the

internet within hours. Was he actually killed? Where is the evidence? Why did the Americans get rid of his body so quickly and in such a strange way? These theories will only grow and add to the mythology.

As it happens, I have my own conspiracy theory. I think the Royal Wedding was a diversion.

Don't scoff. I'm not saying that the British establishment staged the event to suit Washington: just that it was convenient to schedule the raid on a weekend during which two billion of us were dazzled by the ultimate fairytale and escapist telly extravaganza. We continued seeing the world through the soft focus lens of the wedding all weekend.

Is it inconceivable that while the Blackhawk choppers packed with Navy Seals thundered towards Al Qaeda's bunker, Pakistani radar operators were too loved-up to spot them?

Perhaps the Americans hoped bin Laden himself might still be in a romantic stupor. You think that's whacky? It will look very sensible next to some of the theories that emerge in the coming weeks and months.

As you can tell, my personal royal wedding honeymoon period has not lasted long. And reality is going to get grittier still. Twelve hours from now, I will be back at work in central London, blinking in the light of a world that is free of bin Laden but in which the official threat level has been raised a frightening notch or two.

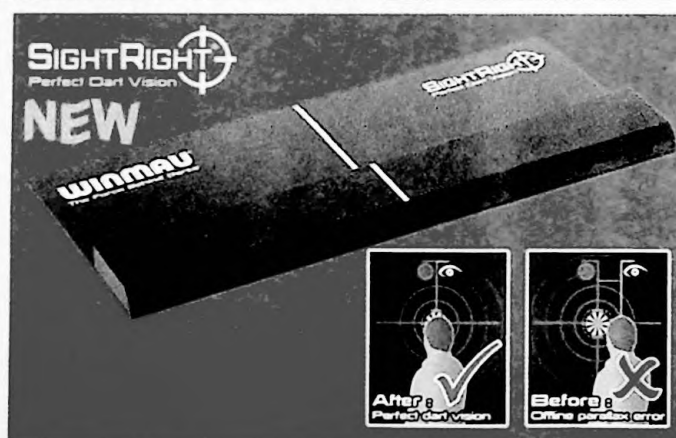
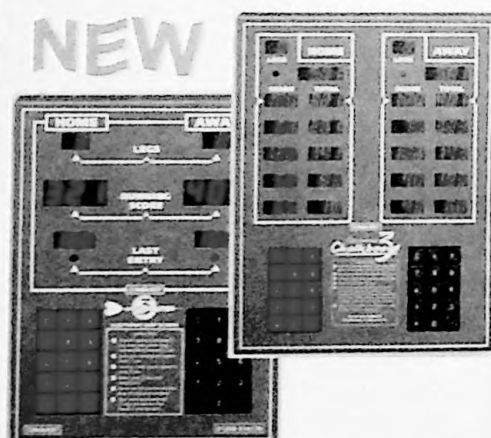
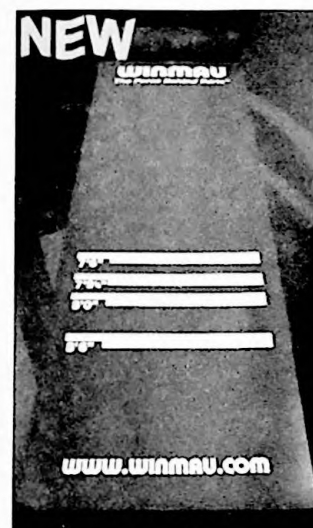

Our new man in London tells us we have reasons to be cheerful

You are described as "our man in London." How would you describe that role in a nutshell and how do you see it in the next three years?

I would say I am one of your men in London because actually the Falklands Islands has got no shortage of people working for it there in the Foreign Office, other government departments and, of course, you've got Sukey Cameron. My title is Deputy Director of Overseas Territories, so the Falklands is not the only patch. But I expect about two thirds of my time realistically will be spent on Falklands issues.

And this is your first visit?

I was appointed less than six weeks ago, replacing Andrew Allen. I was in Washington before. I was head of communication for the British Government in America, which was tremendous fun. Never a dull moment, but very taxing and I learned loads. But actually I'm really excited, genuinely, by this job. It's impossible to exaggerate the amount of interest amongst ministers in the UK for the Falkland Islands. This is a government that is incredibly sympathetic to the ambitions of the Islanders and very supportive, and my mandate from my political masters is to do what is necessary to help this place realise its full potential.

How do you see that interest developing?

We're facing no shortage of challenges here and in the region. You have a neighbour over the water with a sovereignty dispute that is genuinely difficult and has implications, potentially, for people's lives here. So my job is to help as best as possible to manage that so that the Falkland Islands continue to have the government and governance that they want and deserve and can realise the economic potential of the Islands.

Given the uncertainty on numerous issues, such as the continuing sabre-rattling from Argentina, the will-we-won't-we strike oil and other economic pressures, would you say the Falklands is as well prepared as it could be?

Well I think there are lots of issues, and you've outlined some of them there. But I hope it's not being naïve to say that I think Falkland Islanders can have huge confidence in the future. And you're right, you know, nobody knows about oil and what impact, if any,

that is going to have. We've got the international situation and there are other demographic and economic challenges that the Islands and MLAs are wrestling with, but I think there are a lot of reasons to be optimistic, actually. And I think the basic argument that we'd make in reference to your question about Argentina is that self-determination is where the argument begins and ends. People here have a right to choose the kind of government that they want, and I'm increasingly confident that that point of view and that principle is becoming ever well established as an international norm. Just look at the middle east over the past three months. What has that all been about except the fundamental right of individuals to choose the kind of government they want? So we've got no doubts about that, and we will not be shy in making that case. Which isn't to say that we will convince people over the water that we're right and they're not. But we can manage that and ensure the Falklands can develop itself as it wants to.

What can you tell us about progress being made in terms of restoring shipping links and furthering confidence in the future in overseas trade?

I don't want to get into the detail because some of that is sensitive and there are some aspects of diplomacy that actually are more effective when not under the full glare of public scrutiny. But it's absolutely right that it is a critical issue and I can understand why people are worried about it. But having just come from a meeting with the MLAs, they understand the importance and they are working to ensure that the Falklands continues to have its connections to the outside world which are absolutely critical for people and for the economy to thrive.

There are high hopes of a positive outcome. Is that something you can endorse?

I wouldn't really want to get into that, other than to say people understand it is important and it is a big priority of the Governor and the MLAs here, and for me and my team in London.

In regard to the MLAs, how do you see their effectiveness in international affairs?

They have a really important role to play, actually. I think one of the key things that the Falklands needs to do, and we need to do in London, is to make a case for what we are here, which is not as our critics would say a relic of the 19th century imperialist past but a vibrant 21st century community that is democratic, self-sustaining and contributing to the general public good of the South Atlantic. I think those are really important messages that we need to make globally to a whole range of audiences, but they are also messages that can most credibly be conveyed by Falklands Islanders themselves, including their elected representatives. There are international meetings that MLAs attend and they are really effective in getting those points across, and arguing the case for the Falklands. I think we need to do more of it, and I'll do what I can in London to help people here do more of that. But we shouldn't be shy of making the case for the Falkland Islands, and I'm not.

The Falklands has seen its economy shift over the past couple of generations, as you know. Fisheries has taken over from agriculture, and tourism is perhaps the fastest growing sector. How do you see the various sectors growing?

I think the key to economic success, fundamentally, is diversification. I think the Falkland Islands has come a long way from when it was once very dependent on one industry, and it is increasingly diversifying, and that has to be right. I think people can be incredibly optimistic about what the future holds. There's great potential here. Until you come here you have no idea just how spectacular the place is. So straight away you have enormous potential for tourism if you can overcome what are fairly fundamental logistical and practical challenges. But you've got a very, very special corner of the world here and I think being able to share that with tourists who want to come, as you have started to do, it can only be to the good.

During the Governor's swearing-in ceremony he referred to the UK Government's review of its relationships with overseas territories, which he said would consider, among other things, "better defining the framework for the management of issues such as risk and good governance." Can you expand on what this means to the Falklands?

One really key thing that we are trying to do in the UK, and for all of the overseas territories – but this has a particular resonance for the Falklands – is to make all of British Government and the resources of HM Government available to people here. In the past, perhaps, parts of the British Government have regarded the Falklands as the responsibility of the Foreign Office. But what we want and what ministers want is for every aspect of government, and the experts we have back in London to be available to people here because, with the best will in the world, this is still a small part of the world. So I hope that the kind of review that you are talking about will conclude precisely this, that actually helping the Falkland Islands out, because it is part of the British family, is the responsibility of all the bits of British Government.

Is there any particular image that has already burned an impression in your mind?

Definitely. I'm struck by the diversity of the beauty here. Simply walking along the waterfront of Stanley, and the Cathedral with its whalebone arches, and the houses, which are distinctively Falklands. The other day we did what my colleagues described as the M25, doing the northern loop stopping off at places like Blue Beach, San Carlos. The British Cemetery would be one image I would choose: incredibly moving, a reminder of the sacrifices that were made, but set in the most glorious countryside. And we flew over to the West and drove from Port Howard to Fox Bay to meet people there, to have a drink in their club, rudimentary, but warm and welcoming. That's what I would describe the Falklands as: warm and welcoming, but set in the context of the most spectacular scenery. I should say I also have a personal connection to the Falklands, because my wife went to school with Falkland Islanders. We live in Winchester, so she went to Peter Symonds, and in fact my eldest daughter will go there in a few years. So they weren't exactly unknown to me. But to come down so early in my tenure is really great.

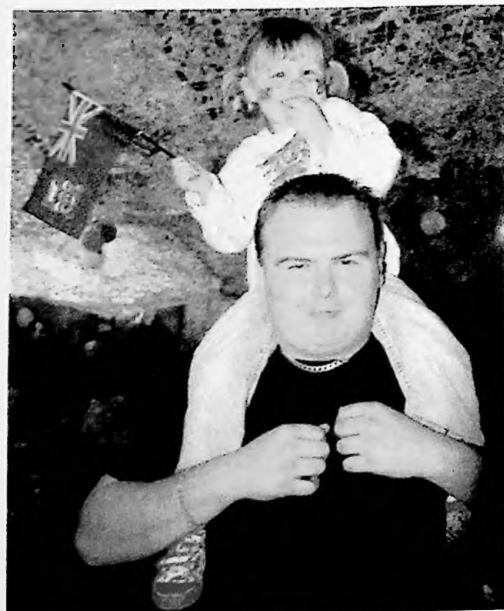

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1. The HO is an integral part of the Search and Rescue crew and both the PIC and HO must agree to commence rescue or training and either may terminate the proceedings if one or other considers the risk unacceptable.
2. The HO is responsible for ensuring he maintains his training and operational currency and his training and operations log.
3. When required, crewmen such as hoist operators are directly involved in the operation and safety of the aircraft. The flight crew is, at times, totally reliant on the guidance and expertise of the hoist operator in order to safely complete a hoisting exercise. The HO function, in helicopter Search and Rescue operations, is a professional and dedicated function.

The HO performs the following duties:

- Assists the crew with aircraft preparation.
- Assists with planning and briefings.
- Assists the pilot as required.
- Provides checks, clearances and directions for the pilot.
- Loads and secures the aircraft.
- Supervises persons carried in the cabin.
- Conducts passenger briefings.
- Assists with basic life-support/medical procedures.
- Carries out air search operations.
- Carries out hoisting operations.
- Inspects and maintains hoisting equipment.
- Responds to hoisting emergencies.
- Inspects and maintains all rescue equipment including the Airborne Rescue Kit.
- Assists with post flight clean up.
- Maintains a search log.

When not otherwise occupied in the execution of HLO duties, he may be asked to act as the loadmaster when conditions dictate. As such, he is responsible for the correct loading of cargo, accompanying the crew on flights, and supervising any persons in the cabin.

IT was a wet and windy Friday morning at MPA when Carl Wareing, Martin Noble and I exchanged introductions and joined Brian Summers on the Islander, which greatly impressed those that had not previously experienced the skill of a FIGAS pilot landing on what appeared to be a tiny, slippery track.

We were met on Saunders Island by Susan and David Pole-Evans and picked up supplies including the rare treat of fresh milk and eggs to start our journey to The Neck, where our mission was to bash the invasive Spearhead Thistle overrunning the coast.

Travel paused for a posing Sparrow Hawk, and to view the recently discovered phenomenon of a bog of white diddle-dee berries before reaching The Neck. It was an isolated spot but provided all basic home comforts, including 24-hour electricity, generated by a small turbine well suited to the salty air and strong winds.

Johnny Rooks were our con-

stant companions so leaving anything on the ground or wearing a hat was risky!

Saturday morning was sunny but very windy as we were introduced to our "thistle bashers" (aka hoes) and we trundled off in the direction of Elephant Point following the north coast, picking off stray thistles along the way.

The coast line was not a leisurely walk as it undulated to extremes, which meant that you not only had to have good leg power to climb up and down but also a strong sense of self-preservation

when hit by a gust of wind on the top of each ridge. On reaching the ponds it was clear the number of thistles was higher than Brian had hoped.

The majority appeared to be new growth generated from seed this season, which was positive in that regrowth from hoeing had appeared to be limited, but also disappointing as we were the fourth group of volunteers to tackle Saunders' thistle problem over the last eight months.

On stopping for a short lunch break Carl, to his embarrassment, promptly fell asleep in the peace and calm of the sheltered area.

After clearing an area to the north west of the ponds we made our way back picking off stragglers on the way.

Just past the "Swiss Hotel" (a rocky outcrop by the camping area) we were greeted by dolphins playing in the surf, a lovely way to end the day.

Sunday morning was calm and bright and made for a swift one

hour walk directly to the pond area where we worked hard at clearing some of the leafy first rosette stages of every thistle growth.

Brian took along his waders and Martin watched closely through the lens of his camera in the hope of a tumble into the mud and water. A small dingy was really needed to reach one island which Brian was unable to get to, though he was successful in most areas and didn't fall once!

By mid-afternoon my arms were aching and I'm sure others were also feeling the strain, but the scenery and sense of achievement kept us inspired.

Thanks must go to Susan and David for their wonderful accommodation, to Martin for the photographs (no-one else took pictures of any work, only wildlife!) and to Brian who was an absolute mine of information and knowledge on all topics. All round, a very productive, informative and enjoyable weekend.

HMS Fearless vets share an extraordinary reunion

WHEN a young Acting Sub Lieutenant was serving on board HMS Fearless during the Falklands War, he could hardly have known the significance that this week in his diary would hold.

As ten veterans from the assault ship gathered at Bertha's Beach on Tuesday to honour their fallen comrades, it was he who welcomed his former shipmates - now as Commander of the British Forces in the South Atlantic.

Commodore Philip Thicknesse invited the Fearless veterans to the Falklands a year ago and, since then, he organised the relocation of a memorial from Lively Island to Bertha's Beach, to honour the six men who were killed on one of the ship's landing craft.

He said it had been "the most special thing possible" to attend the service with his former colleagues, many of whom he had kept in touch with: "Fearless was an extraordinary ship, led by a brilliant captain, and he's left his mark on us," said Cdre Thicknesse.

The crew of HMS Fearless had sailed south for the Falklands full of excitement, Executive Officer John Kelly told the Penguin News.

"We were going on the greatest adventure of our careers," he said.

"But on May 2 it all became rather serious. The Belgrano was sunk and the Argentines retaliated

two day later and sank the Sheffield with an Exocet.

"Then the mood changed on board. It hardened, we became apprehensive. We didn't know what was going to happen."

Fearless made a silent night landing at San Carlos early on May 21: "We achieved a complete tactical surprise, and landed the Royal Marines without any significant loss," he said.

"But everything changed a few hours later when the aeroplanes started to come in."

One of those to witness the offensive from Fearless was Daily Telegraph reporter Max Hastings. "We had the press on board from

the day of the landing," said Capt Kelly. "Max came up to me at the end of May 21 and said he had to have a quiet corner to write his piece. He typed it up and amended it in manuscript in my cabin."

"He handed me the carbon copy and said 'what do you think of that?' It was a wonderful bit of journalistic prose - and I've still got it."

The ship acted as amphibious headquarters during the conflict, at times hosting more than 1,500 men, and the flight deck saw more than 5,000 helicopter landings as she came under heavy attack while at anchorage in Death Valley.

Then, on June 8, the 160-metre long Foxtrot Four landing craft was bombed by an Argentine fighter.

The men in the wheelhouse were killed, although nine soldiers on deck escaped unhurt. Hours afterwards, the very same Skyhawk was shot down with a Sidewinder heat-seeking missile from a British Harrier.

Six days later, the Argentines had surrendered, and once more Capt Kelly found himself with a "guest" in his cabin - their commander General Menendez, who had been taken into custody.

"He was treated and accommodated as one would expect for his rank," he said. "He was sleeping in my cabin with a

sentry outside, given food and water and whisky, and he was eventually repatriated on the prisoner-of-war ship."

When Fearless finally sailed from Stanley the senior officers had a party on the bridge.

Engineer Officer Commander John McGregor said: "I suddenly found my stomach muscles loosen. I realised I had spent the whole war tensed."

"But it was the most exciting, thrilling, gripping thing I've ever been involved with."

Each of those who this week made the 8,000-miles pilgrimage from the UK had different stories to tell, but all were united in their thanks to those in the Falklands who had welcomed them.

Capt Kelly said the ceremony at Bertha's Beach had been "a very moving day," and he was tremendously grateful for the hospitality shown to the veterans and their wives.

"We have been looked after from the moment we arrived," he said. "It has been absolutely marvellous."

Cdre Thicknesse, for whom the reunion was equally poignant, shared his sentiments: "We're close, we mean a lot to each other, and it's extraordinary to revisit these Islands with these people."

FALKLAND ISLANDS

THERE are so many memories of the Falklands War, it is no wonder there is an endless fascination with recounting the triumphs, the failures, the horrors, and even the humour of those days.

This is perhaps why Islanders are so welcoming to those veterans who return: not merely to thank them for liberating the country, though that in itself is of course no small accomplishment, but also to remember what the conflict represented, and how it changed life on the Islands forever.

Those who lived through the conflict speak of the remarkable resilience of residents living under occupied forces. These were the days which transformed an already strongly bound community into one made of even firmer mettle.

Those who made the 8,000-miles journey south to retake the Islands were bonded by the might of the military, and a fighting spirit which grew more restless as they made their final approach.

Former Executive Officer of HMS Fearless, John Kelly, described the morale of his crew as one of excitement as they left Portsmouth.

But by the time she had left Ascension on May 7, both the Belgrano and the Sheffield were lying at the bottom of the South Atlantic. This was war, whether or not it had been declared as such.

John and his fellow officer John McGregor were among the more fortunate to have returned home with no battle scars, either physical or psychological.

But he did recall one moment when, a year after the conflict, he was holidaying on Lake Garda in northern Italy with his wife and three young children.

The lake was very narrow with high mountains either side at one end and, as he took a nap after a hearty lunch, two Italian F104s came roaring down the valley at 200 feet: "I came up with a start and I was right back in San Carlos Water," he said.

Yesterday he was flown to San Carlos with the other Fearless veterans, after another night of reminiscing at a Government House reception and, later, back at Liberty Lodge.

Countless stories and anecdotes have come back to life this week, as this band of brothers has revisited scenes of battle, and paid tribute to those who came to do their duty, but never went home.

Those of us fortunate to meet such veterans have a duty too – to hand down those stories ourselves.

Whether we were here at the time or not, it is one way to ensure... we shall remember them.

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Tax law easier to understand

EXECUTIVE Council agreed at its April meeting to amend the Taxes Ordinance to deal with two issues regarding petroleum licensees.

Assembly Members approved the draft Bill for publication in the Gazette and presentation to the Legislative Assembly in May.

The Bill would provide for a system of civil penalties on petroleum licensees which do not comply with notices to provide information, and extend licensees' liability for amounts due from – but not paid by – contractors operating in their licensed areas to cover payments on account of tax (POAT) and Medical Services Tax (MST).

The Commissioner for Taxation has the power to serve no-

tices on petroleum licensees requiring the provision of certain information, and failure to comply with a notice is already a criminal offence. The proposed amendments would mean that a petroleum licensee would be liable to a £250 penalty for failing to comply by the due date with a notice to provide information, and to a further £250 penalty every 15 days after that until the notice was finally complied with.

Assembly Member Roger Edwards said that in some areas sub-contractors were finding ways of not paying taxes and contractors were having to pay on their behalf. The amendments would make it "much easier to understand and recover the taxes due," he said.

Mixed weather fronts

THE April showers didn't live up to their reputation as last month was much drier than normal – but it was the third windiest since MPA records began in 1986.

Temperature

The mean maximum temperature was 9.7 Celsius compared with an average of 9.9C. The highest temperature was 16C on the 26th and the lowest maximum was 5.4C on the 11th. The mean minimum temperature was 3.2C, compared with the 3.8C average. The lowest minimum was 0.8C on the 8th and 28th, and the highest minimum was 9.5C recorded on the 26th.

Rainfall

The total rainfall for the month was 32.9mm, compared with the April average of 57mm. The wettest day was on the 10th with a

total of 10mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 25 days and 1mm or more fell on 13 days.

Sunshine

There were 119.9 hours of sunshine, compared with an average of 112 hours. The highest daily total was 8.9 hours on the 16th.

Snow/Hail/Thunder/Fog

There were four days of sleet or snow, six days of hail and no days of thunder or fog.

Wind/Gales

The monthly mean wind speed was 16 knots, compared to an average of 14.4 knots. The highest hourly mean speed of 36 knots was on the 22nd, and the highest recorded gust of 52 knots was recorded on the 6th and 22nd. There were gales on five days and 17 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots.

Bit of a change to rig plan

BORDERS and Southern Petroleum is to substitute Ocean Rig UDW's semi-submersible Leiv Eiriksson drilling unit for the unit it had agreed to use in a deal signed last year.

The change in plans comes less than a month after Borders signed a heads of agreement with Falkland Oil and Gas that would have seen the two companies share Ocean Rig's Eirik Raude unit.

The rig is likely to arrive in October following the completion of its operations in Greenland, with the subsequent spud date for the prospect's first well likely to be in December of this year.

Falkland Oil and Gas said the heads of agreement applied equally to the rig and it expected to formally sign the assignment agreement to the rig contract shortly.

Murky legal waters haul trout fishing into limelight

IF you are one of those fishermen who dashes out for the first day of the season and makes your last cast as the sun goes down on April 30, you may want to pick up your copy of the consultation paper on the sale of Brown Trout from the Environmental Planning Department and submit your views.

Until recently it had been widely assumed the Ordinance specifically excluded the sale of fish caught legally. However, it now appears the wording is unclear and advice from the Attorney General's Chambers indicates it is not against the law to sell fish that have been legally caught.

There is a need to clarify the ordinance and, in order to advise Executive Council on the matter, the Environmental Committee is keen to hear the views of anglers, landowners and others.

While there are points in favour of allowing the sale of Brown Trout, such as reducing the need for imports, giving more people the opportunity to eat the delicacy and better management of fishing rights if it had a higher commercial value, there are equally strong arguments why it should not be legal to catch and sell the imported species.

Brown Trout were introduced in the 1940s and specimens of up to 10lbs (4.5kg) are regularly caught. But putting an economic value on trout could lead to more being caught, undermining of stocks and a tourist lure being lost.

The Angling Club is "very concerned" at the possible legalisation of the sale of sea trout which is an important leisure amenity, said club chairman Stuart Wallace.

"The stock is not large and is vulnerable to any increase in effort

and allowing the sale of trout will result in considerably more people fishing it," he said, adding that without adequate study and management the good fishing currently enjoyed could be destroyed.

The Nightingales and Hirtles jointly own the Sound River in the Hill Cove area, a popular spot with sporting fishermen who rarely take their catch. Tony Hirtle and Shelley Nightingale both said they did not support commercial fishing for Brown Trout, adding that even if it did become legal, restrictions would stay in place at the Sound.

Closer to town, Adie Lowe at the Murrell said bringing the subject to the public's attention had "possibly done more damage than just leaving it as it was." He said the amount sold on had been minimal, and fishermen and landowners did a good job policing rivers.

Rape charge

COLIN MacDonald, currently serving a jail sentence for sexual offences, was back in court late yesterday to face two further charges of rape of a woman and one of threatening to kill a woman. His wife Irene MacDonald (54) was also charged with acting jointly with him to rape a woman. The couple acknowledged the charges and the case was adjourned until June 1 for committal to the Supreme Court.

Antarctic steel

THE Antarctic memorial which the British Antarctic Survey and others want to see erected in Stanley will be a "three-metre high needle of stainless steel," according to fundraisers who want to honour the 29 Britons who have died in the British Antarctic Territory since 1948. A site has yet to be earmarked before planning permission can be sought.

Coventry movie

THE sinking of HMS Coventry is to be made into a full-length cinema film to coincide with the 30th anniversary of the tragedy. Big-budget movie *Destroyer* tells the story of the ship and its 300 crew in the weeks leading up to her sinking off Pebble Island.

By-election set

THE by-election for a new Assembly Member for the Stanley constituency, following the resignation of Glenn Ross, has been set for June 23. Nominations open on May 16 and close on June 2, with a list of candidates to be published on June 8.

Tough draw

THE Falklands football team has a tough group in the 2011 Nat West Island Games on the Isle of Wight next month. They play Guernsey on June 26, the Isle of Man on June 27 and Gotland on June 28. Almost 3,500 are taking part in the games, which has already set a new record.

Age and weight

THE Falkland Islands Government Air Service (FIGAS) has a new bookings database and now requires the date of birth of all passengers, as well as their body weights, when flights are booked.

Chile exchange

ANOTHER group of Chilean students from Punta Arenas is to travel to the Falklands in September in a repeat of last May's exchange programme when eight youngsters spent three weeks at FICS.

'Blond Angel of Death' faces kidnap and torture charges

A GOVERNMENT lawyer has called for a life sentence for the former Argentine naval officer Alfredo Astiz who raised the Argentine flag on South Georgia at the beginning of the 1982 Falklands war.

Astiz is charged with the murder of two French nuns during the 1976-1983 dictatorship, although Martin Rico, a lawyer for the Human Rights Ministry, said he considered Astiz to also be jointly responsible for the crime of kidnapping in 12 cases, as well as aggravated torture and aggravated murder in five cases.

Astiz (59), nicknamed the Blond Angel of Death and the Crow, has already been tried and sentenced to life in absentia by a French court for the murder of Alice Domon and Leonie Duquet, who disappeared in December 1977.

"We demand the worst possible sentence: life in prison," said

Rodolfo Yanzon, a lawyer representing Victor Bastera, one of the few victims to survive his stay at Argentina's Navy Mechanics School, which was converted into a torture chamber.

The court is still to hear recommendations from the attorney general, which has also intervened in the case. Astiz sat in court dressed informally and protected by a bul-

let-proof glass box. At South Georgia, Astiz insisted on signing a separate surrender for himself and his small band, even though they were already covered by that of his commander.

Astiz is known to have committed several war crimes during his time on South Georgia, notably attempting to lure Royal Navy helicopters to land on a helipad he had previously mined, after his surrender. The pilots were suspicious, and landed elsewhere.

He also attempted to encourage Royal Marines across a minefield. The mines did not function correctly, as their trigger mechanisms had been frozen solid by the sub-zero weather conditions. Astiz was never tried for these crimes.

He spent time jailed in Britain but was later released and returned to Argentina in spite of the extradition request from the French Government.

British MPs roughing it with the troops

ELEVEN British MPs are visiting the Falklands this week to experience first hand life in the armed services.

The nine Tories and two Labour MPs, including one woman, will sleep aboard HMS York, see Typhoons on patrol and travel around by helicopter.

Burton MP Andrew Griffiths said it was a "superb opportunity" and he was expecting a "no holds barred" experience.

"It will give us a greater understanding of the life of a member of

the armed forces so when we have debates in Parliament we have a better understanding of their lives, conditions and views," he said.

"Most importantly, we will get to talk to ordinary members of the armed forces without somebody looking over their shoulders and hear from them their views, concerns and opinions, so as MPs we can represent them in Parliament."

The MPs travelled with the RAF under the All Parliamentary Armed Services Scheme, dubbed a "mini-Territorial Army for MPs,"

and also were due to pay their respects at the 1982 War Memorial in Stanley.

The party also comprises Richard Graham (Gloucester), Mark Garner (Wyre Forest), Andrew Bingham (High Peak), Caroline Dinenage (Gosport), Robert Ffello (Stoke-on-Trent South), Simon Hart (Camarthen West & South Pembrokeshire), Karl McCartney (Lincoln), Matthew Offord (Hendon), Andrew Percy (Brigg & Goole) and John Woodcock (Barrow-in-Furness).

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

LAST week four Assembly members visited various sites at MPA where we were briefed on potential future availability of some of the civilian posts. The visit gave a good insight into the working of some units. For me the Meteorological Unit was particularly fascinating with much information coming in about the recent storms while we were there. I was interested to see that physical observations have not entirely been replaced by satellite information.

OTHER meetings in which I was involved included Planning and Building, Lands, Mineral Resources, Health and Medical Services and a lengthy pre-budget Standing Finance Committee. We have to strike a careful balance if we are to achieve our targeted outcome without creating undue hardship at a time when people are already being affected by costs outside our control, fuel being the most obvious. We are not alone; worldwide people are being forced to prioritise their personal expenditure to cope with rising food and other costs.

I AM a little puzzled by the apparent need to consult on the need to amend the legislation prohibiting the sale of sea trout. If, as I believe to be the case, faulty drafting made the original legislation difficult to apply then surely a simple amendment would suffice. If we launched a consultation each time a piece of legislation needed correction to have the effect intended when it was passed, then an already overworked Attorney General's department would be stretched further. I hope this exercise is not being driven by commercial pressure. I'm sure an exemption could easily be made for farmed fish if and when it became necessary.

FINALLY I would like to reiterate the plea made by others: if you are not going to claim your holiday credits before the deadline, please think about donating them to SAMA. There is a simple form to fill in, obtainable by email or in person from the Secretariat, and SAMA will receive the full value, thus enabling more veterans to return. Many more could benefit from such trips; we've seen how much it means for our liberators to see the Islands at peace.

Falklands tour best of 13 years in the Army

Jamie McGhee, a former Corporal with EOD during 2006 and 2008, is currently working with the Halo Trust mine clearance company in Afghanistan and plans to settle in the Falklands in the next year or so. Here, he tells of his time in the Islands and what made it a special tour of duty for him...

WHEN I came back to Stanley after a seven year absence from the Islands I really wasn't expecting it to have changed much in such a short time frame.

Hillside Camp was pretty much the end of town at that point, but the changes that had taken place were vast.

I arrived on Christmas Day 2006 and went into the mess bar where I was introduced to a bunch of local people, and it quickly became apparent that this wasn't the usual military tour. It's not normal practice to have locals in a military bar.

The one thing that made this tour so different from the rest was the fact that the local community welcomed me so warmly. I never felt like an outsider, and that still stands to this day.

They were always helping us out when we needed anything and we followed suit. Although we were never really asked, we would always volunteer ourselves for jobs around town, especially when the Darts League were setting up for tournaments in the Town Hall or FIDF Hall.

I particularly recall when we had to check the memorial sites the Royal Engineers were responsible for and get them up to a high standard ready for Liberation Day.

We needed to get the fence around Sapper Hill rebuilt as it was in a poor state of repair, but the budget available was not sufficient. Locals completely rebuilt that fence and painted it free of charge - and we bought them and ourselves a few beers as a thank

you for a job well done. I've never served anywhere where the locals would have contemplated working alongside the military without expecting something in return.

The respect Islanders show towards the military can't be matched anywhere, and I'm sure that everyone who has done a tour with the JSEOD in Stanley would agree with that comment wholeheartedly. The 1982 war and what the British forces did for Islanders is still in the hearts of everyone there, young and old.

I can honestly say that my 18 months on tour with the EOD detachment in Stanley were the best of my 13 years in the Army.

I genuinely feel sorry for the Royal Engineers who will now serve under the JSEOD in MPA, and not get to know the people they are supposed to be protecting the way I did - it's an impossible task from 32 miles away.

Apart from the tasks we carried out in and around the minefields scattered across the Islands, a rather interesting job, purely for the comedy value, although it could be dangerous depending on the weather, was replacing the batteries in the lighthouse at Mengary Point.

On a regular basis we would go out on the Sullivan launch then have to load batteries onto a Gemini (inflatable boat) and paddle into a hollow in the rock face and wait to time the wave right.

The "chosen one" would then have to reach out in desperation to grasp the rocks and pull the Gemini closer while everyone else used them as a ladder to clamber on to dry land carrying the batteries. Getting everyone back on the Gemini and back to the launch was just as hysterical.

The very fact that the RE detachment has relocated to MPA disturbs me massively, not because Stanley is better (although I think it is) but because the majority of the minefields are in and around Stanley; which is why the Royal Engineers were located there in the first place.

The RAF side of the JSEOD doesn't deal with mines; they would instead repair the runway at MPA and deal with aircraft bombs in the event of an attack.

If there was an accident in Stanley the team will have to fly down, providing there is an airframe available, so the response time will not be as swift as the detachment being located in Stanley.

The EOD Detachment regularly worked alongside the fire service and police during incidents, such as the Stanley common fire, and more notably jumpers from fishing ships which has become more regular.

In the event of war the Royal Engineers role, whilst I was still serving in Stanley, was to disrupt and delay enemy advances from the air and sea by disabling the Stanley airport, and other possible runways such as the race course, and destroying ports.

While the FIDF would also be working on these defences their backup is now further away and does not enjoy the close relationship we were fortunate to have had.

Dedicated service from the EOD

THE Falkland Islands Joint Services Explosive Ordnance Disposal detachment recently moved headquarters from Lookout Camp in Stanley to the military base at Mount Pleasant.

Although four minefields were cleared of more than 1,200 mines during the 2009/10 summer, Stanley as well as several settlements on the East and West are still surrounded by minefields.

However, the dedicated work of EOD personnel over the years has kept the Islands population safe.

More than 1,000 Argentine anti-personnel mines, 80 anti-vehicle mines and 1,000 booby traps were cleared in 30 minefields in the immediate aftermath of the 1982 war.

All UK-emplaced mines in five anti-personnel minefields around the then RAF Stanley were lifted immediately after the cessation of hostilities.

The EOD have kept public awareness of the dangers of unexploded ordnance very much alive over the years, and regular visits to the schools left all ages in no doubt of the consequences of

interfering with any items discovered on or around the battlefields, or the stupidity of entering a minefield.

Children were even shown a gory mock-up of a severed foot still inside a boot to ensure they would follow the strict guidelines of marking the whereabouts of suspicious items so they could be safely dealt with.

The Stanley based JSEOD team has dealt with over 2.8 million items of ordnance from bullets, flares and grenades to rockets, mortar shells and 1,000lb bombs since 1982.

ExCo wants changes to phone ban

WHILE Assembly Members support the idea of not using mobile phones or handheld radios while driving, Executive Council was not happy with some of the exemptions recently proposed and have asked for a paper calling for a ban to be adjusted.

Assembly Member Roger Edwards said the public was already aware to a certain extent of the restrictions on using mobile phones, as was evident by the number of people pulling over to use their phone. But he said they were not happy with some of the exemptions proposed, and thought they could be overcome by having proper hands-free use of systems.

"Public service and military vehicles were being given exemptions, but we thought they were just as likely to get into bother as anybody else," he said.

The paper is to be returned to the Assembly in due course.

Saints survey to lift jobs market

EXPAT St Helenians are being sought to take part in an online survey which aims to understand why Saints leave the island, and what factors are important in their decision to return.

About 550 Saints live in the Falklands, the second largest group of overseas-born residents.

Another 630 live on Ascension Island, and there are thought to be up to 10,000 Saints in the UK, more than double the island's resident population of 4,000.

The survey is part of a wider effort to improve St Helena's labour market, particularly as many Saints living overseas intend to one day return.

A similar survey two years ago revealed the majority left their home in pursuit of higher income but, with most still having close family on the island, more than half of respondents said they would "certainly or probably" re-

turn to live on the island permanently. Lilla Oliver, St Helena Director of Education and Employment, said: "It is vitally important that as many overseas Saints complete the survey as possible, regardless of whether they intend to return to the island or not, and regardless of where offshore they are based."

The survey is designed to support a government strategy to ensure targets are met for a "sustainable and appropriately skilled labour market, including circular migration and adult vocational training."

Report praises dedication and skill at KEMH

ACCORDING to a recent assessment by senior clinical staff from the Ministry of Defence Permanent Joint Headquarters (PJHQ), the delivery of healthcare by a dedicated team of professional and support staff at the King Edward Memorial Hospital (KEMH) is to a high standard and individually patient focused.

"The ability of KEMH to deliver the diverse range of services in challenging circumstances, both geographically and professionally, is a credit to the individuals who work for the organisation," said Lt Cdr J P Després, author of the report put before the April Executive Council.

"This is further enhanced by recent progress by the Director and the senior management team to identify where improvements can be made and efficiencies saved, to the benefit of patients and the organisation."

The assessment was made following a visit to the hospital by Lt Cdr Després in October last

year. The greatest challenge now for both the government and the Director of Health and Education was to develop and implement a strategy for the future provision of healthcare over the next 20 years and beyond.

Lt Cdr Després said success in achieving this would ensure that healthcare kept pace of changes both locally and globally, met current and future demands of a quality, was patient focused and a cost efficient service that was responsive to the needs of the population.

Following his appointment in January 2010, Director of Health and Education David Jenkins initiated a wide-ranging review of the health service in order to assess the current level of healthcare provision.

The main aim was to identify areas of good practice and ensure these were continued and disseminated as appropriate, while also identifying those areas in which improvements could be made.

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Bid to recreate Beagle voyage

THE Falklands is scheduled to play host to the re-creation of one of the most famous voyages in history.

An ambitious project to recreate Charles Darwin's five-year circumnavigation of the globe in the 1830s – which included two visits to the Falklands – has been announced by an international group of scientists.

They plan to set sail from London in 2014, not only with a replica of HMS Beagle, but also with a scientific ship.

Ravinder Bhatia, director of the South American HMS Beagle Trust, which is organising the bold bid, said the sister ship would be "one that Darwin would have chosen if he had made his journey in the 21st century."

Scientists plan to emphasise the project's focus on international education, explaining what will be accomplished inside the state-of-the-art scientific vessel along the way.

Eulogio Soto, PhD in marine biology and oceanography at the University of Valparaíso, said the project "has great potential for scientific and educational cooperation

between Chile and the UK, and among academics in Latin America in general."

British and Chilean backers of the proposal are due to meet in Chile to work on the £20 million plan, which scientists hope to see supported with educational activities on board the ships as well as at their ports of call.

HMS Beagle left the UK in December 1831, under Captain Robert Fitzroy, heading south west to the Falklands where, in 1833, sailors surveyed approaches to harbours in the Islands.

It was during this visit to the Falklands that Darwin studied the relationships of species to habitats, adding fossils to his collection.

They returned to the Falklands in March 1834, just after an incident where gauchos and Indians had butchered senior members of Vernet's settlement, and helped to put the revolt down.

It was around this time that Darwin's reputation as a geologist and naturalist was cemented as experts in the UK studied specimens collected by him earlier in the voyage.

Yachties clubroom dismissed

THIS month's Planning and Building Committee meeting was chaired by Councillor Jan Cheek supported by Councillor Roger Edwards. Apologies were received from Councillor Sharon Halford and lay member Heather Norman, and it was the last meeting for lay member Robert French who had attended for the past three years.

Within the usual preliminaries was an update on the appeal by the Falkland Islands Yacht Club against refusal of planning permission for the siting of a Portakabin for use as a clubroom on the north side of the mooring area at the Canache. Environmental Planning Officer Antony Payne reported that Executive Council had dismissed the appeal.

Only six applications were scheduled for discussion and all received conditional planning permission. These were as follows:

- An extension to their dwelling at 1 Jersey Road for Robin and Wendy Luxton.
- Permission in principle for the erection of a single-storey dwelling on land within Bennett's Paddock on Moody Brook Road for Stuart and Lilian Wallace.
- Falklands Fish Farming's proposal to erect a polytunnel on the Aquaculture Site at Moody Brook.
- Siting of a container for storage of building materials near 12 Mink Park for Hannah Humphreys (already sited, it was noted, in advance of the application).
- Change of use from workshop to residential unit at 72 Davis Street for Ana Crowie.
- Application for full planning permission for food preparation area for home delivery and a music studio at 98 Davis Street for Sue Goss.

In the case, permission was granted for a limited period only to expire on May 31 2012, with other conditions which included limiting food deliveries with the use of four-wheel drive vehicles only between the months of May and August inclusive. Deliveries at all other times shall only be made by moped.

Members were pleased to note that it was the intention of the applicant to relocate the business to a more suitable non-residential location.

Before concluding the meeting members took note of eight applications being processed by Building Adviser Nick Stephens for the grant of a building permit.

The next meeting is scheduled for June 2 at 8.30am in the Liberation Room of the Secretariat.

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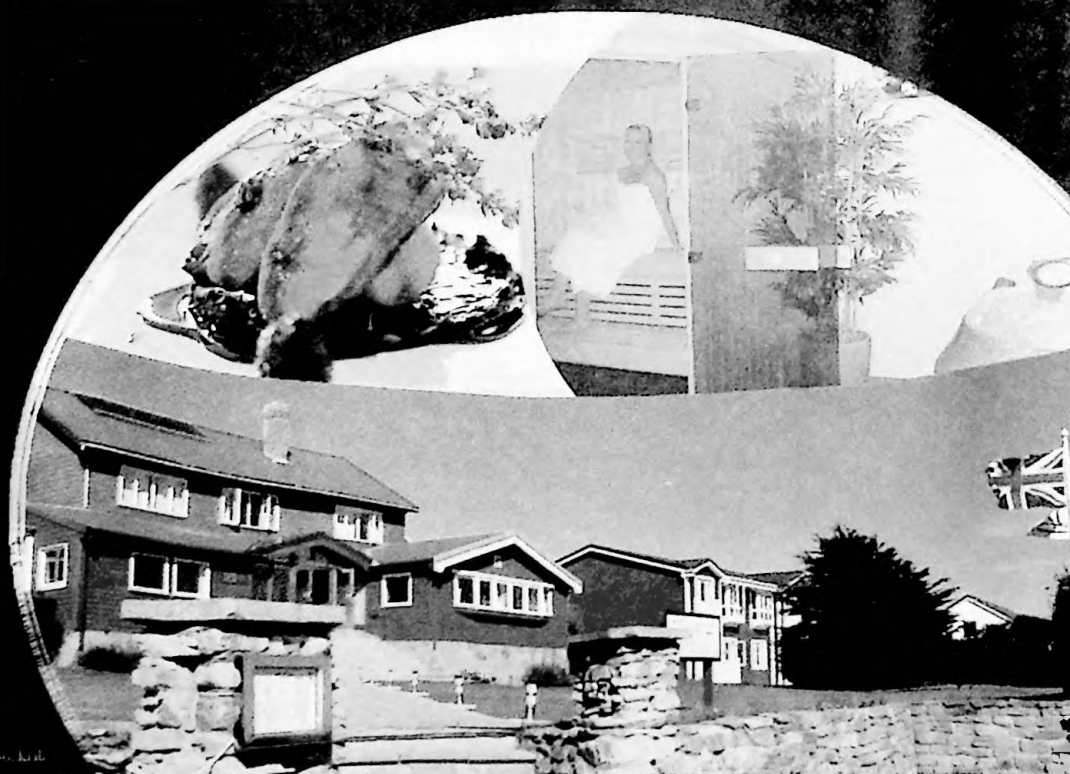

Bucket wielders were also out in force on Friday. Trawling the pubs were the ladies in pink fluff, and their efforts raised an incredible £420 from generous punters, with the money to be split between the Cancer Support and Awareness Trust and Ovarian

Cancer Action UK. Stanley's runners were not alone in their efforts as Marlene, Nuala, Deirdre, Jennifer, Rachel, Ben, Helen and Abigail at Fox Bay all raised £205 for the cause from their sponsored run.

Out West where the riding and views are the best

"A COUPLE of people have booked a four-day horse ride on the West at Easter – do you and Dixie want to come along?" said Dae as we rode along Surf Bay. With the sun beating down, the surf glistening like the crown jewels and the sweet smell of warm horses in my nostrils, the answer was a resounding yes.

My fellow horse-mad friend Dae Peck and her family own Shallow Bay sheep farm on West Falkland and offer self-catering and horse riding to their guests.

A month later as we gathered at Hill Cove the summer was winding down, and there was a sharp nip in the air, but not enough to cool our enthusiasm for the ride.

Bobby Short, colt tamer extraordinaire, who often rode and helped us out with our horses in Stanley, had also shipped his horses across and was along not only for the ride but also to explore some of the beautiful West we had been harping on about.

The horses had come across on the ferry with Dae two days earlier and, as we swept down Shallow Bay Mountain to the settlement, I spotted my mare Dixie grazing with the troupe near the road. At my call she raised her head and pricked her ears in recognition. The long journey had done her good it seemed.

Known as a "good doer" she is one of those horses that need to be shut away from grass in the summer and, because I haven't got the heart to do it, she ends up like a Thelwell pony and we bounce around just like one of the renowned artist's cartoons.

Shallow Bay is also home to a sizeable troupe of thoroughbred horses and Major Gold, an imported stallion, stands as stud there. Inevitably the horses were soon run into the corral, checked over, one ridden to make sure it was OK for the next day and the history of each discussed. Might sound boring to some, but it's bliss to us old horse

lovers.

Horses aside, Shallow Bay's self-catering is one of the Island's oldest stone houses, comfortably furnished while maintaining its historic character and overlooking Keppel Island. It's a perfect step back in time with mod cons and the most amazing views and sunsets.

Community School teachers Pam Beggs and John Carlin arrived later in the day and soon we were settled in, watching the sun go down, swapping stories of old, late, great horses and riders while enjoying a tot or two and trying to ignore the wind getting up.

Day 1 - The story telling had done the trick. We were all so fired up we'd devised a plan to take the vehicle into Hill Cove settlement and leave it there so we could all ride.

The Shallow Bay Posse consisted of myself and Bob, Dae, Paul and Reba Peck, Pam and John. We had an afternoon start to catch the tide at the Sound and thankfully the hair-wrenching wind was dropping off as we made our way up the mountain soon after 2pm.

We could see the tide wasn't low enough to cross at the Stick so we made our way across the sands to the top pass near the causeway.

A favourite story from the previous night had been of Hill Cove shepherd Tom Aldridge crossing the Sound in deep water to find a shoal of trout giving his horse's undercarriage a bit of a tickle up causing a lively exit from the channel.

Bobby and Paul's feet had been out of sight for a few moments in the middle, and I was glad to have a tall horse and short legs for once, and at least there were no trout or seals lying in wait. Pam and John's faces were a picture as we ploughed through the water and I could see they were having a ball.

A couple of hours later as we made our way

into Hill Cove the sun dipped, bathing the settlement in dusky pink; it seemed it was over all too quickly, but at least we had three more days to ride.

Dae's sister Shelley Nightingale was there to welcome us and remarked what a great and rare sight it was to see a string of riders coming into the settlement again.

The West Lagoons farmhouse was home for the night and the hot, rich stew for supper was devoured as though we'd been out all day, not just a three-hour jaunt. And there was also a mound of yummy cake to keep Mr Carlin, who we'd discovered had a very sweet tooth, quite happy!

Shelley and husband Peter have been running their Homestay for more than ten years and are brilliantly relaxed hosts. The warmth, lovely food and cosy bed with a good book was a perfect end to day one.

Day 2 - It was just a mere breeze yesterday! The sea is being hurled at the house along with a driving mist, and waves are filling puddles on the road. Shelley laughs it off, says the wind will drop and adds: "It'll be fun."

Now I'm no softy, but it looks pretty fierce, so when we get a call from Dae at Shallow Bay to say the wind is dropping off and they will be ready to leave in half an hour, I'm still a tad sceptical. But geared up and riding towards the Top Settlement it really does drop a bit, and I wonder if Shelley is some kind of weather witch!

It's a quick start to the ride. John proved himself on Spitfire yesterday and has a fresh mount in the form of Sudaña, one of Dae's retired racehorses. Dae had told him that if she played up to "stick her on the road and make the old bugger go," and he was following her instructions to the letter.

The wind was taken out of her sails climbing to the top of the Kitchen, and we settled into a steady pace for Westley. It was all good going, but John's adventure wasn't over. Sudaña picked up the pace again across a white flat, refused to ease up for a ditch and stuck both front legs in it. John sailed over her head landing with a perfect Para roll causing gasps from Reba and I as we wondered if either had been hurt. Back in the saddle John wasn't at all deterred and kept up front with Paul and Bob as we made our way down the steep hill to Westley and another warm welcome; this time from Dae's younger sister Penni McKay, Tex Hobman and their son Tyler.

It was beginning to feel like we were riding from restaurant to restaurant as Penni plied us with freshly cooked dough fries filled with golden syrup and Tex poured the hot rums. Now that's good old Falklands hospitality. The evening ended with us further fed with roast mutton and veggies and singing along to Marty Robbins and Johnny Cash songs. Bobby sure can belt out the Strawberry Roan, a fitting tribute to our West adventure!

Day 3 - Bobby was up early to take Tyler for his first ever ride. Much as he enjoyed it, the canny eight-year-old wasn't too sure if he had time to take it up seriously: "There's a lot to do on the farm and I've got a four-wheeler that needs riding," he said.

The wind was gone and all were eager to head over the mountains to the coast and down to the Boundary; mine and Reba's turn to take the Rover. The excesses of the night before had left me feeling a bit below par and Dae had the offer of

riding Apache, Bobby's very smart and fast trotting tabiana. No prize for guessing who was out front on this leg!

We met the jubilant posse later that day as they approached the Boundary, bathed in sunshine and crowing because I had missed the best ride.

It was Di and Bernard Betts' "restaurant" this time, as the horses rested in the grassy sheep pens and we exchanged yarns with our hosts. The Betts family had raised and raced some of the Falklands great horses and it didn't take much coaxing before Di was up on Dixie, the prettiest mare on the West for years, and riding for the first time in a decade for Hill Cove.

Our mission of sharing the love of horses was not over yet, though, and within minutes of hauling up outside the Innes household Paul had Gordon settled on his handcrafted western saddle and was agreeing to take him riding at Shallow Bay in the near future.

Gordon and Bella treated us to a scrummy curry for supper that night while Gordon entertained us with jokes and navy songs in his rich baritone voice.

Day 4 - The final day and an early start to catch the tide at the Sound. We geared up as the sun climbed in the sky. Shelley decided to join us on Bobby's spare horse, boosting the posse's numbers to eight.

The sands were silver in the early morning light and as the riders strung out across them I felt a great surge of pride in my heritage. We were only making short jaunts for fun and, because for most of us, it was a part of our younger days we missed. But for many years horses were the only

form of transport and it wasn't an easy life for anyone, but at least we were keeping part of that lifestyle alive.

John and Pam also had picked up on how special it is to ride in the Falklands with nothing but nature's sounds and smells for company: "This is the best way to see and feel the Falklands," John had said on day one.

The tide was low enough to catch the Stick pass and I thought of an old Shallow Bay shepherd who'd left Hill Cove to ride home in the dark after a few tots one night, and dozed off on his horse which decided to make a beeline for home regardless of tides and woke to find himself halfway across with teal ducks swimming around him. They don't make them like that anymore.

There's been a long line of McKays at Hill Cove, and Dae and Shelley had been taught to ride by their father Dick McKay, a renowned hard task master with a wicked sense of humour that lives on in his children and grandchildren.

Shelley had the final word as she delivered Pam and John's biggest compliment with a cheeky grin: "You don't ride like teachers," she said. "When we were kids dad used to yell at us 'sit up, you're riding like a teacher; mind you, to be told you were riding like a doctor was considered a damn sight worse than a teacher.'"

Department of Agriculture Wool Market Report 5th May, 2011

Tony Mills, Department of Agriculture, Falkland Islands
The EMB has had a slightly bumpy ride since the last report prior to the Easter recess. This week it closed at 1306 AU/kg (843 GB/kg) after a drop to a low of 1294 AU/kg. It would appear that the market correction that occurred with the final sales before Easter is a more permanent feature. Analysis suggests that this cautious sentiment is on the back of lower quality offerings and shifts in exchange rates along with a wait and see approach on market reaction post the Easter recess. Year on year results demonstrate a significant change in fortunes but I'm sure fortunes are not being made. The ever present cost-price squeeze that affects agriculture worldwide is still evident. By my rough calculations if a producer was to be on an equal footing with the good times of the late 80's, then taking account of inflation, prices would probably need to be another 50 - 80% higher.

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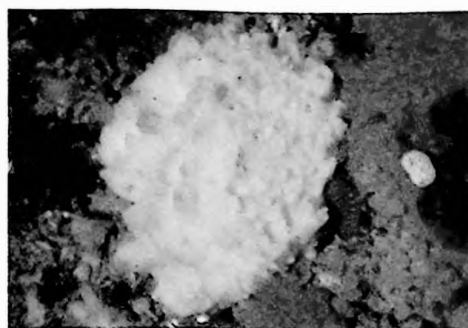

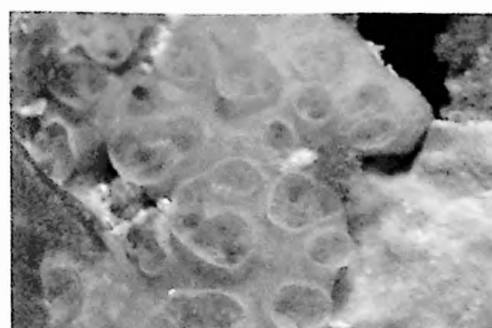

Researchers thrilled at discovery of twelve new species of sponge

A SCIENCE journal in the UK has published the discovery of 12 new species of sponge in the seas around the Falklands.

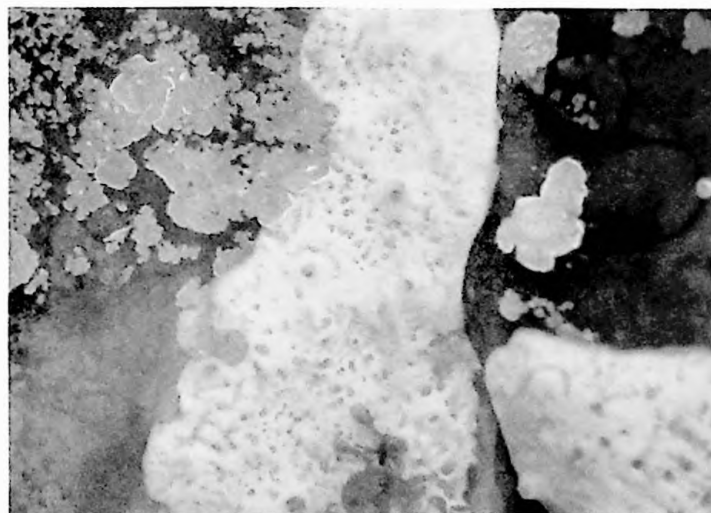
The new species were discovered by sponge taxonomists Dr Claire Goodwin (National Museums Northern Ireland) and Jennifer Jones while working with the Shallow Marine Surveys Group. The specimens were collected by SCUBA diving from the Jason Islands and around Stanley.

"SCUBA diving is an excellent way of collecting sponges as we can record their living appearance with underwater photography," said Jennifer.

"This is of great use for initial identification and future field surveys. Many species have only been recorded from dredged material and, as they lose their colour when preserved, their living appearance is not known."

The new species are *Lophon pictoni*, *Lissodendoryx* (*Ectydoryx*) *jasonensis*, *Phorbas ferrugineus*, *Phorbas shackletoni*, *Myxilla* (*Styloptilon*) *acanthotornota*, *Amphilectus fleeciei*, *Amphilectus dactylus*, *Mycale* (*Aegogropila*) *nodulosa*, *Scopalina erubescens*, *Scopalina bunkerii*, *Amphimedon calyx*, and *Pachychalina erinacea*.

"We always get asked if we are going to name species after ourselves, but this is considered very

had form," said Jennifer. "However, we have named two for Bernard Picton and Francis Bunker, UK colleagues who assisted with the work. Other species were named for characteristics of the sponge, for example *erubescens* means 'blushing' in Latin. We chose this as the sponge is a beautiful salmon pink colour, and *dactylus* mean 'claw like'."

The species *Amphilectus fleeciei* was even named after local yacht the Golden Fleece, which was the survey vessel for the Jason Islands trip.

The scientists visits have been supported by the Shackleton Scholarship Fund, and more recently the John Cheek Foundation. One of the most distinctive sponges was named *Phorbas shackletoni* in recognition of the Shackleton Scholarship Fund's support of Claire's participation in the Jason Islands survey.

"Sponges are a comparatively poorly known group," said Claire. "It is estimated that only half of extant species have been named. However, we were still surprised by the number of new species we

found. The geographic isolation of the Falkland Islands may account for this. Sponges only have a short larval period so species from other areas are unlikely to be able to colonise here."

Claire said there were still more sponge discoveries to be made, and she and Jennifer were working on material they collected from another survey trip to Beauchêne Island last year.

The surveys were undertaken in late 2008 and the findings have recently been published in the *Journal of the Marine Biological Association of the UK*.

Dr Paul Brickley, director of MSG, said: "Sponges are some of the most dominant fauna underwater in the Falklands and, until this work, even some of the most common species did not have scientific names."

"Being able to record these species accurately will be of great benefit to MSG's continued survey and monitoring work. This type of data is critically important to the understanding of the biodiversity of the Falkland Islands."

"The survey highlights how much of our amazing marine life still remains undiscovered, and we look forward to working with Claire, Jennifer and taxonomists for other groups on future projects."

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FIG Environmental Studies Budget 2011/12

The Falkland Islands Government provides funding to help people in the Falkland Islands to conduct activities which benefit and enhance the environment. Anyone can apply for assistance from the Environmental Studies Budget (ESB), including owners and managers of land, non-government organisations and international scientists that conduct research and conservation activities in the Falkland Islands.

Projects eligible for ESB funding must assist in the management or enhancement of the biodiversity of the Falkland Islands. Priority will be given to initiatives addressing the key three themes of the 'Falkland Islands Biodiversity Strategy', which are: environmental research, on-ground action and education.

In addition to this, priorities identified at the recent workshop to review the Biodiversity Strategy are recognised as being of particular importance. These areas include:

- Coastal and marine species and ecosystems
- Biosecurity and invasive species control

The ESB has a formal application and decision making process with the Environmental Committee responsible for the allocation of funds. This year all the available funds will be allocated in one round in June 2011.

The deadline for applications is Monday 13th June 2010. The application form can be obtained from the Environmental Planning Department or online. Applicants are encouraged to discuss proposed projects with the EPD Environmental Officer prior to submission and he can also help draft your application. Where possible, some level of co-funding or in-kind costs (e.g. labour, equipment) is desirable.

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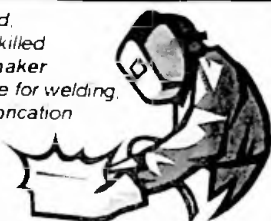

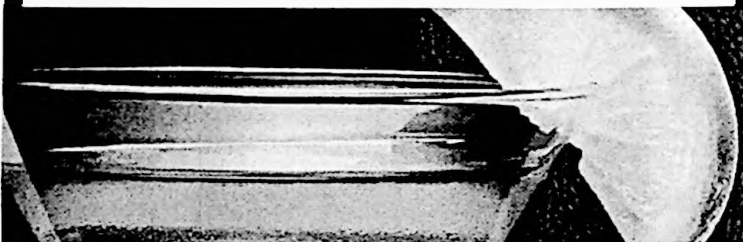

Dismissal case may be appealed by FIG

THE Falkland Islands Government was yesterday granted leave to consider appealing against this week's court ruling that former Stanley House night watch keeper Kenneth Stewart was unfairly dismissed.

The judgement is believed to be the first case of its kind against FIG, but news that the government may appeal to the Supreme Court had now left him "distressed and upset," the court was told.

Mr Stewart's legal representative Keith Watson said he "fundamentally disagreed" that his client's compensation claim, thought to be in the region of £10,000, should be delayed as Mr Stewart had provided proof of his claim when required.

There also had been ample time for FIG to look into the background, he said, and Thursday had been the day for determination.

"If the government is not up to speed on this, then that is their problem, because I am," he told the court, adding that Mr Stewart was "distressed and upset" at the Crown's decision to consider an appeal.

On Tuesday, before Justices of the Peace Keith Biles, Terry Spruce and Ruth Taylor, Mr Watson explained how his client had been shortlisted and recommended for the position of night watch keeper in December 2008.

Human Resources had agreed the appointment and it was approved by the Governor, subject to a standard police check being carried out.

Stanley House is the hostel for children from Camp and Mount Pleasant attending school in Stanley.

Mr Stewart had a number of convictions dating back to 1985, including traffic offences, breach

of the peace, theft and harassment with the most recent being in 2006.

The police check, however, was received by the government, and the conditional job offer was made, with effect from January 31 2009.

Mr Thorogood, he said, had "gone off on a frolic of his own," and he said the letter contained a note of "coercion."

"Play it my way and it will all go away," was the message, said Mr Watson.

"Mr Stewart didn't, he went for it and came second," he added, referring to a capability hearing held in January 2010 when Mr Stewart was found not suitable for the watch keeper's role and was offered alternative employment within government.

The finding of the capability hearing was only briefly alluded to during Tuesday's hearing, the sole purpose of which was to establish whether Mr Stewart had been unfairly dismissed.

Three jobs were offered to Mr Stewart, but he turned them down.

The first was due to a lack of computer skills, and subsequent offers were rejected because of complications of a medical nature.

An occupational health assessment had confirmed Mr Stewart's inability to undertake any heavy work as a result of a long term back injury.

The government made no further offers of redeployment after November 4, and Mr Stewart was advised of his dismissal on November 10.

Mr Biles said the panel was not satisfied that the government had made sufficient effort to find suitable acceptable alternative posts before terminating Mr Stewart's employment, and that such a dismissal was found to be unfair.

Mr Stewart's failure to declare previous criminal convictions or a health problem, "either through error, a mistaken belief that matters would come to light anyway, or by design, has contributed to this action," said Mr Biles.

That the Falkland Islands Government is considering appealing is, of course, its legal right. But at what cost to the taxpayer?

If it does decide to challenge the ruling that Kenneth Stewart was unfairly dismissed, his compensation claim of around £10,000 may appear paltry by comparison.

In September 2009 Mr Stewart received confirmation of the successful completion of his probation period as night watchman.

However, in November 2009, Mr Stewart received a letter from Chief Executive Tim Thorogood informing him that having considered the frequency and scale of his convictions he should not be in the post.

Mr Watson said the letter was written in the first person, overriding the previous head of HR and anyone else in the appointment process.

AND so Falkland Islanders are asked once again to go to the polls, this time to fill the seat on the Legislative Assembly vacated by Glenn Ross. Only those registered in the Stanley constituency may wield their democratic right this time around, and they number 1,311.

How many of those who cast their vote will be interesting to see, not least with a proportion being absent on their traditional midwinter holidays, while more than 40 will be driving, kicking and shooting their way across the Isle of Wight in the NatWest Island Games.

In the General Election of November 2009, a total of 998 Stanley residents turned out to vote, representing three-quarters of the electorate. Mr Ross polled a highly respectable 491 votes, the third most popular on the new Assembly, beaten only by Dick Sawle and Gavin Short.

His departure was greeted with a deserved chorus of praise, and those who placed Mr Ross at the top of their ballot papers, along with the rest of the electorate, will have plenty of head-scratching to do as June 23 looms.

Jan Cheek, in her Penguin News column, says she will be looking for "an honest, intelligent candidate who can clearly demonstrate that they will be able to give the time needed to share the workload."

And that is a moot point. Given the nature of that workload, and how it has broadened considerably in recent years, it is increasingly difficult for full-time workers, be they bosses or employees, to take on those added responsibilities of an Assembly Member.

So will the next in line be a cashed-up retiree or a professional willing to donate the bulk of their spare time to serving the people?

Whoever it is, thin-skinned, half-hearted or candidates who want to keep up with every episode of Coronation Street need not apply.

And those who don't use their vote will have no right to complain about the outcome.

And another thing...

ELSEWHERE on these pages, readers will spot a notice announcing Lisa Watson as the next managing editor of the Penguin News. Lisa begins her second term with the paper on June 6, immediately after my contract expires, and I cannot imagine a better qualified person to take over the reins. Lisa will have the opportunity to reintroduce herself in a couple of weeks.

Falklands War crimes rejected

CHARGES of abuse, ill treatment, torture and alleged homicides committed against Argentines conscripts during the Falklands War by their officers, some of them still on active service, have been declared unenforceable due to time lapsed.

The cases were first taken up by the Human Rights Secretary from the Argentine north east province of Corrientes in 2007.

Former conscripts revealed the ill treatment they were subjected to by their own military officers, and were later joined by other former soldiers, revealing many instances of life-threatening abuses, humiliation and starvation.

One soldier said in his testimony: "We'd find a sheep, a cow, whatever, and we would kill it to feed from it. How we cooked it, when we could, or eating semi-raw was the way to avoid the starvation situation."

But officers reacted with contempt. Argentine federal prosecutor Marcelo Rapoport said: "When soldiers were discovered by their officers, they were staked to the

ground, tied by ankles and wrists, no matter the freezing weather, snow and lack of food. This went on for hours, sometimes days, with no kind of aid plus the risk of enemy artillery fire."

The case also includes claims of "homicide as a consequence of the starvation."

Despite the many testimonies, last month the Argentine Comodoro Rivadavia Federal Chamber agreed with what was previously ruled in 2009, and established that the alleged crimes could not be described as "crimes against humanity," and the case of "Pierre, Pedro Valentin, number 1777/07" had to be instead considered invalid because too much time had passed.

Three members of the Federal Chamber last month passed the ruling on the case, although two alternate magistrates who sat did consider the crimes as being "against humanity" and disagreed with the ruling.

It is reported by Mercopress that the Comodoro Rivadavia ruling will be appealed.

Liberation Day bank holiday for Britain?

A MIDLANDS MP wants Falklands Liberation day to be celebrated as Britain's newest bank holiday.

The UK Government wants to scrap the May Day bank holiday and has asked for ideas for a replacement.

Among the contenders so far are St George's Day (April 23) and Trafalgar Day (October 21).

But Dudley North MP Ian Austin says the whole of Britain should commemorate the liberation of the Falkland Islands in 1982.

Speaking in the House of Commons, the Labour MP said:

"Thirty years ago next year, British forces liberated the Falkland Islands.

"They did not just free the Falklands, but fought for democracy and freedom more broadly.

"Would it not be right for the nation to celebrate that anniversary next year, and every year, on June 14, as an example of Britain's commitment to democracy, equality, freedom, fairness and tolerance?"

"People say that every other country can claim those values just as much as Britain can, but I do not believe that to be true."

Super head recruitment proves a costly exercise

THE Chief Executive's claim that the appointment of "super heads" within government would save money is not being borne out, with soaring recruitment costs, redundancies and contracts not being completed.

Costs for direct recruitment have already reached £175,400 so far this financial year, and that sum does not include a portion of travel costs for interviewers.

Councillor Jan Cheek told the Penguin News that interviews were normally arranged for dates when interviewers were overseas for other purposes, and that had been the case during the interview process for the Chief Medical Officer conducted overseas last month.

But the Treasury has confirmed that the flights for Chief Executive Tim Thorogood, Director of Health and Education David Jenkins and Dr Roger Diggle, the current Chief Medical Officer, who conducted the interviews, were in fact all paid in full from the medical budget.

They also did not secure a person for the post, despite one candidate being flown to the Islands, with his travel costs also coming out of the medical budget.

Cllr Roger Edwards said the candidate had very quickly realised "he did not have the appropriate background to take on the CMO position."

Hospital Manager Michael Poole confirmed on Tuesday that a CMO had still not been appointed, despite Dr Diggle being due to leave the Islands on June 25, and discussions were to take place on Mr Thorogood's return to the Islands on Wednesday.

Mr Poole said there were two options: to appoint another potential candidate, or to re-advertise for an interim post.

In 2009 the Chief Police Officer was made redundant nine months before his three year contract was completed to make way for the appointment of a new Director of Community Safety. Recruitment and associated costs in the changeover between Paul Elliott and Gary Finchett reached £56,280, almost a full year's wage for the then Chief of Police.

The Director of Community Safety, however, is paid in the region of £90,000, including a 25 per cent gratuity, but it is still among the lower paid super heads.

With the wage difference and recruitment fees, more than £80,000 has already been clocked up for this post alone, with costs being met from the police budget.

There is now an overseas recruited Interim Director of Community Services (the title has recently been changed) in place, pending the outcome of the new government review, expected to be completed in September.

But the possibility of a Director of Community Services being recruited locally is not an option because the job description, authorised by the Chief Executive, requires the post-holder to have at least five years at police superintendent level, which automatically excludes not only Fire, Immigration and Defence department heads from applying, but also police staff, some of whom have spent decades working their way up the career ladder.

Cllr Gavin Short said if the job description was allowed to stand, it had effectively been taken out of the reach of any local person, and that the incumbent could only

ever come from the police was "totally unfair." Executive Council instructed Mr Thorogood in 2009, when the government management structure was being formed, that one of the purposes of the review was to give local people "more opportunity to move into senior positions, not less."

The appointment of an Interim Director of Community Services was, said Cllr Short, a stop gap measure: "A lot of us made our suspicions and unhappiness with the new senior structure of FIG known at the time of the election."

"The majority of us have pressed for a review of the super heads for some time. We even got as far as formulating the draft terms for the person or persons who might undertake the review."

Cllr Short said everything was "sailing along fairly happily" until Mr Finchett announced his resignation at a time when the MLAs were nowhere near agreeing the terms of the review.

"We were persuaded by the administration that rather than leave this particular group 'headless,' an interim appointment be made in the way that it was, so that if we do restructure the grouping then the present incumbent might be able to carry on as the Chief of Police."

Cllr Short said he was pleased at least three super heads had been locally recruited, but he added: "Locals are being brought on, but it is going to take time, and I don't want to see a local put in a position that they aren't trained or ready for, possibly in the full knowledge that they will fail."

"Let's take it gently and make sure that whilst there must be no foot-dragging, our local people are ready before being placed in positions of great responsibility."

"I guess even if we do have a few hiccups and the occasional clanger along the way, they will be our clangers, and we and the local head will have to live with them and sort them out," he said.

Common mines

A TEAM from the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and the MoD arrived in the Falklands on Tuesday for a visit with potential bidders for the demining contract, due to begin this summer. This will be a land clearance project and the team is looking at the Stanley Common area to see what can be achieved.

Oils well ahead

DRYSHIPS has won a \$46 million contract extension with Borders & Southern Petroleum for its semi-submersible drilling rig Leiv Eiriksson, after the exploration company declared options on two more wells. The rig, expected to arrive in October, should spud its first well in the first quarter next year.

MPA death

A DEATH at MPA is currently being investigated by the Ministry of Defence. A soldier from 460 Port Troop of the Royal Logistic Corps, attached to Joint Force Logistic Unit, was found dead in his room on May 10. His name has not been released due to family reasons. No other details were released.

Same as ever

MAY Ball organiser Phil Middleton has confirmed that the minimum age limit for entry to the annual event is 15 years, as it always has been. The rule has in the past had to be enforced, he said.

A belting fine

IN the Senior Magistrate's court on Friday, Stanley man Shane Mitchell (17) was fined £100 for not wearing a seatbelt while driving. He was also ordered to pay £85 prosecution costs.

Students shortlisted in media awards

TWO students and a teacher or accompanying adult will be representing the Community School at an awards ceremony in London next month.

They were invited after the school was shortlisted in the Shine School Media Awards, which recognise the best publishing projects by secondary school students.

The competition is for pupils in England and Wales who create a school magazine or newsletter, either in print or online, and publish

it using their artistic, editorial and technological skills.

Business Studies/ICT teacher Pam Beggs, who ran the project for FICS, said she was very excited for the school to be nominated in the Best Community Initiative category.

The school will be represented at the ceremony, to be held at Stationers' Hall in the City of London on June 27, when prizewinners for all categories will be announced. Ms Beggs yesterday at-

tended the Education Board meeting with acting head teacher Helen Bell where funding was agreed for the UK trip.

Sir Christopher Meyer, former British Ambassador to Washington, will present the awards, which include cash prizes and the latest Quark XPress 9 DTP System.

Awards chairman Clifford Jakes said it was "fantastic news" for FICS pupils, who had shown real enthusiasm for all aspects of publishing.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

A QUIETER week, if the Airbridge gets in through the fog we will meet those bidding for the next phase of land release. I hope that any necessary ground restoration is built into the contract this time.

OTHER meetings include a regular monthly meeting as one of the Medical Services portfolio holders and Education Board. Four of us also drove through the thick fog on Monday night to attend a celebration at MPA marking the successful completion of the runway resurfacing project. This was a vast project, which must have been a logistic nightmare to plan and run.

WE also met with a couple of Argentine film makers; it is always good to ensure that any visiting South American film crews and journalists have a chance to hear the facts as opposed to the myths about the Falklands. The more widely we tell our true story, the more evidently implausible Argentine Government propaganda becomes.

WITH the by-election date set I wait, as a Stanley voter, to see who we will have to choose from when nominations close. I will be looking for an honest, intelligent candidate who can clearly demonstrate that they will be able to give the time needed to share the workload. I will be assessing whether they have taken steps to find out how FIG works and whether they demonstrate a clear understanding of broader political and financial issues. Anyone planning to stand for election needs to be willing and able to put our case when and wherever needed.

NEXT week's budget session will keep us heavily occupied; it is a critical time for all of us. You have only to see what dire straits much larger economies are experiencing to understand the fragility of our own. People worldwide are being forced to adjust their lifestyles to cope with rising fuel and food costs. Fuel costs impact on almost everything we do from the simplest task to the most complex project. It reduces the profits of the businesses that provide much of our tax revenue and adds costs to almost every government department and operation.

Postal and proxy voters urged to apply quickly

VOTERS unable to cast their votes in person on the day of the June 23 by-election have less than a fortnight to lodge applications for postal or proxy votes.

The deadline for applications is 12 noon on Wednesday June 1 but, because applicants must adhere to strict rules of the Electoral Ordinance, they are being urged to apply quickly.

Attorney General Mark Lewis said: "It is recommended that those wanting a postal or proxy vote make their application in good time and not leave it to the last minute."

Those wishing to vote by post, or appoint another person (proxy) to vote on their behalf, must not only sign their application, but also ensure their signature is witnessed by another elector or a justice of the peace.

Proxies must in turn satisfy specific regulations, and postal proxies and overseas voters are also obliged to meet certain conditions.

"The bottom line is that people must get a move on if they are not able to vote in person on the day," Assembly Member Dick Sawle told the Penguin News.

"Strict rules apply, and anyone who thinks they can pop into the Registration Office just before the deadline may discover they do not meet all the necessary conditions."

Take a bow if your surname is Clarke, because you are a member of the biggest clan on the Stanley electoral roll. While a few other families have voters in waiting, only those aged 18 or over – and who are officially registered – make the official list. Those names registering a dozen or more are:

"I would urge anyone who wants a postal or proxy vote to fill in their forms as soon as possible."

The by-election for the Stanley constituency was triggered by the resignation last month of MLA Glenn Ross, who was elected to the Assembly in November 2009.

Under the Electoral Ordinance, a by-election has to be held within 70 days of the vacancy arising.

The date was officially announced last Thursday, when Acting Governor Ric Nye signed a Proclamation and Writ of Election, fixing the date for June 23, as chosen by ExCo.

Acting Governor Nye told the Penguin News: "It was felt that as late a date as possible would be good to allow for all the preparations and electioneering."

"The latest possible date was June 30 but there is an ExCo

meeting on that day so the week before was chosen."

Dates were then slotted in for potential candidates to make themselves known. Nominations opened on Monday, and will close at 4.30pm on Thursday June 2.

The complete list of candidates will be published on Wednesday June 8, and details of polling places will be announced in due course. The poll is due to be conducted between 10am and 6pm.

For more details on postal or proxy votes, call the Registration Office on 27269. Potential candidates should contact the Secretariat on 28450.

John Birmingham yesterday indicated he would stand in the by-election. At least four others are still considering, including Mike Summers, Norman Clark, Ian Hansen and Steve Vincent.

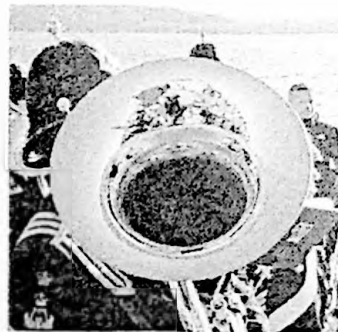
The band with no instruments plays out in the House of Lords

THE military band which famously arrived in the Falklands last month – without their instruments – has been rumbled in the House of Lords.

During Your Questions Answered, or at least its equivalent, Labour peer Lord Berkeley asked why the UK Government transported the Volunteer Band of the Mercian Regiment to the Falklands to celebrate the Queen's birthday on April 21 after their musical instruments had been removed before take-off.

He also asked "what contribution the band was able to make to the celebrations without any instruments, and what were the costs of such personnel transport to and from the UK."

In a written answer on May 13, Lord Astor of Haver, Conservative Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Defence, said the band's instruments were classified as freight rather than passenger hold baggage and it was



No instruments was a big blow "in error" that they were not loaded on to the flight, with the hold already full to capacity with other essential freight.

"The next flight to the Falkland Islands did not depart until April 23," said Lord Astor. "So the personnel were unable to participate as planned in the Queen's Birthday Parade. Instead they undertook a programme of familiarisation and training with British Forces South Atlantic Islands."

He said the band travelled using spare capacity on the Airbridge, which represented no extra cost to the Ministry of Defence, other than the air passenger duty for the band's seats which amounted to a maximum of £2,040.

When the band arrived they received generous offers of donated instruments, although health and safety and insurance issues scuppered the idea. But when the band did leave bereft of brass, they also left behind a hanging thread: if we had the musicians in the Falklands, could we not form our own military band?

Major Peter Biggs of the FIDF said a band of combined military and community musicians was a good idea but, after seeking the advice of local musicians, it was apparent that even if they could find the required instruments, it was unlikely enough dedicated musicians could be found to play them. The last local military band of the Falkland Islands Defence Force was in the 1960s.

Reducing discards for a better finfish fishery

EFFORTS to reduce the discarding by the finfish fleet of under-sized rock cod should lead to conservation benefits and a more profitable fishery, according to Falkland Islands Fisheries Department (FIFD).

The latest reported discard figure for 2010 revealed an estimated 16,876 tonnes (23%) was discarded, although this is considered to be an underestimate by FIFD.

One of the recommendations from the Rock Cod Stock Assessment Report (2010) was an investigation into the mesh sizes of nets used in the fishery with the objective of increasing the minimum length fish caught to one that is commercially utilised.

Fisheries Biologist/Marine Ecologist Paul Brickie said that reducing the discard of rock cod should have a major conservation benefit and result in a more profitable fishery in the future.

"It will also reduce the significant effort which goes into discarding rock cod at present," he said. "Reducing the discard of small rock

cod will also make reporting easier and will of course have benefits with respect to reducing seabird mortality."

Seabirds are attracted to the discards as they are swept from the scuppers to the warp/water interface and become damaged or killed as the warps slice through the water.

But mesh size increases are not the only option for dealing with the avoidance of juvenile fish.

Seasonal closures of areas are other possibilities, but these are difficult to manage, as the distribution of marine populations can change.

With this in mind the FIFD asked the Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association (FIFCA) to consult their vessel operators on the matter.

Mr Brickie said the department was particularly interested in what the industry considered to be the minimum commercial size, how they would achieve this (through closed areas or increases in mesh size) and, finally, how an

increase in mesh size would impact the selectivity of other species including kingclip, hake, hoki blue whiting and red cod.

A pleasing response was received from the fishing industry, he said, with many useful suggestions, and only one or two negatives ones.

"These have helped us formulate a strategy for dealing with the problem."

"This will include a thorough examination of the seasonal population structure of rock cod in the FICZ to examine whether a series of seasonal closed areas might be possible."

"The other objective will be a series of mesh trial experiments to be carried out next season in order to examine the selectivities of various mesh sizes on rock cod and other commercial species," said Mr Brickie.

Once this data has been analysed and reported a second round of consultation will take place in order for the fishing industry to comment on the recommendations.

History project plea to FI and Argentina

A RESEARCHER from the University of Liverpool is conducting a study which will examine how youth from the Falkland Islands and Argentina learn about their own history.

The study - to be conducted by interviews on skype - will also reflect on the perspectives of youth in the region regarding the ongoing tensions between the UK and Argentina.

Dr Matt Benwell will ask how the attitudes of youth may differ to those of older generations, as well as considering the significance of these differences for future relations in the region.

youth, academics and teachers, he now wishes to focus on the question of what it means to be a young Falkland Islander, as well as exploring the role of education, adults, commemorative events and popular culture in the formation of their national identity, historical knowledge and political perspectives.

Dr Benwell, who is a member of the Department of Geography, is asking young people aged from 18 to their late 20s, who are currently living in the Falklands or who grew up on the Islands, as well as teachers or other interested individuals, to contact him via email at m.c.benwell@liv.ac.uk if they would like to undertake a 30-40 minute interview.

Kirchner's October tip

ARGENTINA has formally announced the date for its general election, although President Cristina de Kirchner has yet to officially announce she will stand.

The election will take place on October 23, with primary elections due on August 14.

Even though President de Kirchner has yet to announce her re-election bid, she leads comfortably in the opinion polls and several presidential hopefuls have opted to step down in her favour.

Lower House Congressman Ricardo Alfonsín has emerged as the leading opposition candidate in recent weeks, but he faces an uphill battle to unite Argentina's fragmented opposition and convince voters to give his party, the Union Civica Radical, another chance at running the country.

Ricardo's father, Raul Alfonsín, resigned in 1989 before the end of his first term amid hyperinflation, while Fernando de la Rúa stepped down in 2001 amid a deep economic crisis and violent riots.

As we prepare to face the world's spotlight, this is who we really are

Assembly Member Emma Edwards reiterates "why the Falklands want to stay British" in an opinion piece published recently on the website Totalpolitics...

IN November 2010, journalist Peter Preston set out his opinions on the future of the Falkland Islands.

He urged Her Majesty's Government to "ditch the Falklands" and to start discussing the possibility of shared sovereignty with Argentina.

Twenty nine years ago this June, British Forces liberated the Falkland Islands from Argentine invasion. Since that time, there has been much discussion and conjecture over the future of the Islands; however, in public debate at least, seldom have the views of the Falkland Islanders themselves been sought.

With impending Argentine presidential elections, oil and gas exploration, and the 30th Anniversary of the Falklands Conflict next year all likely to attract global interest, the issue of the Falkland Islands and their future will con-

tinue to be debated in newspaper columns in the UK and elsewhere. But what do the people that live there actually want?

One area that the people of the Islands are all agreed on is their right to self-determination.

This value is protected and promoted by democratic powers the world over: the Falkland Islands are no different.

Falkland Islanders are often described as being "more British than the British."

This assumed stereotype fails to take into account the varied backgrounds and culture of the residents, including a sizeable Chilean population as well as Americans, Canadians and Russians.

There is often criticism from some commentators that, in this age of austerity, the Falkland Islands is a financial white elephant. This is something of a misconception.

Given that the defence of the Islands falls under the control of Her Majesty's Government, there is the cost of maintaining the British Forces Garrison, which is borne by the UK Government. Outside of this, the Islands are 100

per cent economically self-sufficient, with a highly successful fishing industry, a developing tourism sector and oil and gas exploration being undertaken in Falkland Islands waters.

To dismiss the Falkland Islands' place in the family of UK Overseas Territories on financial grounds alone does not make sense. On October 23 this year, Argentina goes to the polls. President Fernandez-Kirchner is likely to seek a second term in La Casa Rosada and is likely to reach for a comforting and well-used political crutch in the run up to polling day to help rally support for her re-election: the "Malvinas" question.

Falkland Islanders are accustomed to political rhetoric emanat-

ing from Buenos Aires, but recent moves by the current Argentine Government are conspiring to make every day life difficult for Islanders.

Rising food import prices and non-cooperation over fisheries management are just some of the areas in which Buenos Aires have looked to increase tension.

Despite these moves, the people of the Islands remain resolute in their desire to not only determine their own future, but to trade with South America and seek normal relations with the Argentine Government for mutual, practical benefit.

It is a source of great regret within the Falkland Islands Government that relations with Argentina have deteriorated since the 1990s, when significant progress on cooperation was made.

Once again Falkland Islanders are preparing to find themselves in the world's spotlight, but this time we hope that at least our wishes are clearly understood: we are Falkland Islanders first and foremost, but also wish to remain an integral part of the British Overseas Territories community.

Tax reins tighten for petroleum licensees

EXECUTIVE Council has agreed to amend the Taxes Ordinance to deal with two issues regarding petroleum licensees.

Assembly Members approved a draft Bill which would provide a system of civil penalties on licensees who do not comply with notices to provide information, and extend licensees' liability for amounts due from – but not paid by – contractors operating in their licensed areas to cover payments on account of tax (POAT) and Medical Services Tax (MST).

The Commissioner for Taxation can serve notices on licensees requiring the provision of certain

information, and failure to comply is already a criminal offence.

The proposed amendments would mean a petroleum licensee would be liable to a £250 penalty for failing to comply with a notice to provide information, and to a further £250 penalty every 15 days after the due date until the notice was complied with.

Assembly Member Roger Edwards said in some areas sub-contractors were finding ways of not paying taxes and contractors were having to pay on their behalf. The amendments would make it "much easier to understand and recover the taxes due," he said.

The largest population of gentoo penguins in the world?



WELL... we think so! More than 121,500 breeding pairs of gentoo penguins (about 30 per cent of the global population) were counted this season as part of the Island Wide Census, a combined effort involving many landowners and organisations across the Falklands.

Results from the 2010 Island Wide Census mean the Falklands are likely to represent the largest gentoo population (followed by South Georgia with 90,000 pairs estimated in the mid 1990s). It is likely to be the largest because we cannot account for changes in other populations.

The 121,500 pairs counted this season is 84 per cent higher than the number counted during the last Island Wide Census conducted in 2005 (66,000) and 90 per cent higher than the 1995 census (64,000), but similar to the population estimates for 1933 (116,000) and 2000 (113,000 pairs).

It is fantastic to report that the Falklands population of gentoo penguins is healthy.

Unlike rockhopper penguins, gentoo penguins have

shown the capacity to bounce back from detrimental events such as the 2002 Harmful Algal Bloom, which caused mass adult mortality across several sites.

But let's be clear about the results – we are not saying the Falklands population has increased by 84 per cent!

Although the overall trend is an increase in gentoo numbers (about an 8 per cent increase between 2000-2010), the 2010 Island Wide Census further highlights the considerable variation in the number of penguins breeding between years.

As many landowners are aware, gentoo penguin numbers tend to oscillate, meaning that large inter-annual variation in the number of breeding pairs is not unusual. For example, in 2009 we recorded a 30 per cent decline in breeding pairs at our annually monitored sites (compared to 2008), but in 2010 we recorded a 60 per cent increase when compared to 2009.

We think the variability in the number of breeding pairs between years relates to a combination of deferred breeding (ie birds choose to breed, or not to breed) and vari-

ability in the recruitment of juvenile penguins into the breeding population.

In turn, breeding "participation" and recruitment are likely to be influenced by food availability over winter and, in particular, during the lead up to breeding (ie spring) when birds must build up their fat reserves.

Because resources available to gentoo penguins vary between years, so too does the number of breeding gentoo penguins.

It is not surprising that these awesomely adapted seabirds are sensitive to changes in their environment.

What we did this summer...

- Fourth Falkland Islands wide seabird surveys. In 28 days more than 300,000 penguins and 400,000 albatross pairs surveyed by a 12-person team.

- Fourth year of the albatross demographic study (sadly this year affected by the storm in December), successful continuation of albatross tracking.

- Satellite tracking and diet study on Southern sea lions, in collaboration with the British Antarctic Survey, began in February.
- King penguin satellite tracking initiated at Volunteer Point in April.
- FC-organised trips to help landowners plant tussac, including West Point, Bleaker Island and Elephant Beach Farm.
- Sixteen national Important Plant Areas identified.
- Four thistle bashing trips to Saunders Island.
- Tussac restoration project initiated at Cape Pembroke.
- Land restoration trials monitored at newly cleared miredfield sites.
- Sixty WATCH Group children explore, climb and camp the Islands. Karen Neely replaced by new leader Maggie Battersby in May.

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Reindeer to be targeted following success of rat eradication Phase 1

REINDEER will be the next invasive species to be removed from South Georgia, following the success of Phase 1 of the multi-million pound rat eradication project.

The Habitat Restoration team used two helicopters to spread baited pellets over an area of 12,500 hectares, several times larger than previously attempted worldwide, in its latest bid to rid the island of rats.

Monitoring will continue until Phase 2 is due to start in 2013 and the whole project, covering 80,000 hectares, is due to be completed by 2015.

Meanwhile, as part of the government's ongoing efforts to protect and restore native species and habitats, reindeer will be among the next targets.

Reindeer were introduced to the island in 1909 by Norwegian whalers, and now occupy two large peninsulas on the north coast, in two distinct herds, separated by glaciers.

However, they continue to degrade the native vegetation, and the swiftly accelerating rate of glacier retreat, as a direct result of climate change, means those gla-

ciers will soon no longer present a barrier to the reindeer.

Over the past 60 years the vast majority of the island's coastal glaciers have retreated, some by more than 4km, with the most rapid retreat occurring in the past decade.

In the near future, says South Georgia Government (GSGSSI), the glaciers that at present are so effectively stopping the reindeer from spreading will retreat to the extent that they no longer present a barrier.

As a result, reindeer will then be able to access previously ungrazed areas, and the abundance

of food will result in a significant increase in population, putting huge pressure on native species and causing great damage to the remaining pristine areas.

GSGSSI last year carried out a stakeholder consultation based around a review of all published scientific literature pertaining to reindeer on South Georgia. Ninety-five per cent of respondents were in agreement that GSGSSI needed to act to manage the reindeer.

Following a meeting in September, it was agreed reindeer should be entirely removed from South Georgia, and that advisory groups

be set up to decide how best to eradicate them.

A GSGSSI spokesman told the Penguin News the advisory group meetings should conclude mid-year, after which a decision would be taken in regard to the timing of the cull.

While no timetable has yet been set, it will be necessary to clear reindeer from the Barff and Stromness areas before rat eradication can take place in the later phases of the Habitat Restoration Project.

If deer were present during baiting they could consume the cereal-based rat bait, so denying it to the target rodents, and potentially suffering poisoning as a result. As a part of its commitment to safeguarding and restoring the native species, habitats and landscape features of South Georgia, GSGSSI emphasised the removal of any invasive mammals would be carried out "in as humane a manner as possible."

Other invasive species they have identified on the island, and whose removal can realistically be achieved, include mice, bittercress and pearlwort.

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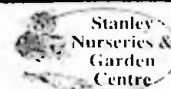

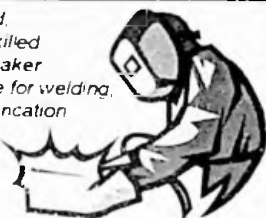

Governor lays out serious national challenges ahead

THE Falkland Islands Government must grit its teeth and seek "practical, imaginative and sometimes bold solutions" to its domestic and international challenges, Governor Nigel Haywood told Members of the Legislative Assembly on Wednesday during his address on the state of the nation.

He said the most important of these was the economy, and the government's response in its budget, due to be delivered today.

With inflation at the end of March climbing to 7.4 per cent, and the negative impact of recent fuel price increases yet to flow into the economic ledgers, many in the community were facing hardship, he said, but the government would press on to pursue economic growth and introduce programmes to help the less well-off.

Despite his words of caution, he said overall the economy had progressed well, resisting the global slowdown to return growth of 5 per cent from 2009 to 2010, with a further 2.55 per cent anticipated for the current year.

But while oil exploration had bolstered government coffers through personal and corporate taxation, income from the country's two biggest drivers of the economy – fisheries and tourism – left a little to be desired.

Fisheries income had remained at historically low levels, he said, although the new Illex licensing provisions should lead to a "substantial increase" in revenue, and tourism numbers had "taken a dip," with a direct impact on public and private revenues.

However, the agricultural sector, while no longer a dominant force in terms of income, had performed well, with FIMCo processing more than 26,000 lambs during the recent export season.

Rising costs were among the toughest hurdles ahead, particularly in health and education, and the Economic Development Strategy would have to be implemented

effectively to sustain economic growth. Governor Haywood said a Falklands Economic Council was to be formed to provide "continuity, momentum and substance" to the EDS.

And, of course, there were the continuing attempts by Argentina to derail the economy of its neighbour: "There are many reports of companies coming under Argentine pressure..."

"Our approach has been not to react to each and every report and public pronouncement but to continue to develop the economy in our own way, and to ensure that we are not diverted by outside pressure.

"In order to succeed we must concentrate on our goals and on our agenda, not someone else's."

The question of shipping, he said, would be pursued in a "quiet but effective way," and plans would be announced "as soon as it makes sense to do so."

Highlighting tourism as one of the sectors through which the country's economy could flourish, he said the development of the Stanley waterfront was a key plank in the new Tourism Strategy, as well as investigating the potential of the North American tourist market, and the possibility of enhanced air links.

There was, though, much work to do to improve facilities if the Islands were to realise the potential from new markets.

"We will need more accommodation of a high standard, more organised activities, greater choice of quality catering and international standards of customer service," he said.

Tourism development and the potential localisation of support functions at Mount Pleasant and Mare Harbour represented potentially major changes to the economy, but infrastructure development and immigration had to be tackled successfully to "ensure the strengths of our cohesive community are not undermined and that a balance is struck between economic growth and preserving the community."

Aside from continuing to promote the Islands' status, constitutional and legal position on the world stage, Governor Haywood said the government had a number of other priorities for the coming months.

Among these were a review of immigration, the localisation of government jobs, ensuring health care was effective and affordable, and focusing more heavily on secondary and further education.

Employment law and telecoms regulation were both under review, and housing remained another key issue, with the government due to announce plans for the phased development of the Sapper Hill site over the coming months.

He also noted a number of successes: the smoking ban, new mental health legislation, changes to immigration policy, agreement on the principle of a minimum wage, completion of the Economic Development Strategy, implementation of the Rural Development Strategy, completion of the Port Howard ferry terminal, the Islands-wide digital TV rollout, the abattoir upgrade and the new container park.

"The picture I have painted in this address is of a resourceful community, which has a long history of meeting challenges effectively, and which is facing a number of further challenges today in its characteristically inventive and practical way," he said.

"The vision of the Islands which sits behind this is of an independent community which upholds the rule of law and which seeks a peaceful co-existence with its neighbours. It is also of a community with high standards which we have to work to maintain.

"There are serious challenges ahead... but the government will continue to work on them, and to seek practical, imaginative and sometimes bold solutions. These will, of course, be made known as they come to fruition.

"It is this quiet but effective approach which I believe will enable the Islands to continue to look forward to the bright future which they deserve."

However, in future the approach may not be quite so quiet, as the Governor said there would be more overseas tours by MLAs so they could influence opinions, and more visits to the Islands by overseas journalists.

He also announced the plugging of a gap which had left the government sorely wanting in terms of proactive marketing, and meeting opportunities to promote the Islands' domestic achievements across the region and the globe.

A new post of Public Relations Manager is to be created to support the need to "tell the success story of the Falklands as a modern community with a successful economy, a commitment to the highest levels of environmental stewardship, and a huge tourist potential."

COUNCILLOR Short wasn't the only one who may have thought he was in the middle of a bad dream during Wednesday's Legislative Assembly, when the cost of a single cattle grid installation was revealed (see opposite).

And if that wasn't bad enough, news that a perfectly good section of road had been recapped on the West, when parts that were almost impassable or at best downright dangerous in the winter had been ignored, left many reeling, including myself.

The lay members on the Transport Advisory Committee (TAC) for both East and West during the lead up to these contracts and decisions being made was a particularly vociferous one.

And they didn't only voice their own opinions; they actively went out and checked the roads, gathered information from those directly affected and dutifully delivered it back to the committee. All to no avail it would seem, and I recall one of them venting their frustration at the futility of it all within one of those meetings.

Now I am left wondering... what is the point of having committees, working groups or even an Assembly, if those being advised and/or contractors just go ahead willy-nilly and do whatever they see fit?

I'm glad that Cllr Bill Luxton asked the questions in a public forum, but then after I'd cooled down a bit, I began to question why a more proactive approach hadn't been taken at the time. Not only from Bill, upon whose backdoor step the work was being carried out, but by others who were going to be affected by a lack of work in their areas.

Don't give up shouting and yelling, even stage a protest if you have to; take a thermos and a snack and plonk yourself in the middle of the road. I know it seems like nobody is listening, but it is the taxpayers' money being flushed down the pan, and if those who are paid to protect or at least ensure wise spending of public funds are not prepared to do anything other than refer issues to the Public Accounts Committee after the horse has bolted, then we all have a duty to make our concerns heard.

I don't envy our elected members having to finalise the budget today, although they have been presented with a set of sound figures and reasoning by the Financial Secretary (and Acting Chief Executive for a good portion of the year - now there's a man who earns his wage). But as long as these nagging wastages continue, the more we are going to pay in increases year-on-year to meet the medium term aim of a surplus or at least a balanced budget.

Cattle grid costs raise eyebrows

A QUESTION about the cost of road and cattle grid repairs on West Falklands caused raised eyebrows and a request for a breakdown of costs in the Legislative Assembly on Wednesday.

The total cost of works on the Port Howard to Fox Bay road last season was £134,102, as per the contract awarded to McLee Ltd. Cllr Sharon Halford told Cllr Bill Luxton in response to his question.

Cllr Luxton said the repairs which had been carried out on the 3½ mile stretch between the Hill Cove and Chartres turn-offs, recognised as one of the best sections of road on the West, was a "total waste of money" and would have been better spent on the "death trap areas" south of Fox Bay.

Cllr Halford said she had been under the impression that spot-capping was the order of the day, not entire sections, and in the future best use of what was avail-

able should be made. Cllr Luxton asked Cllr Halford to ensure at the Transport Advisory Committee (TAC) that the area at Carew Harbour was addressed with some urgency because it was a real death trap.

A further £9,800 had also been contracted to McLee Ltd for a new cattle grid at the Fox Bay airstrip, as agreed by the PWD Highways survey group, because it had reached the end of its life with all materials supplied by government, Cllr Halford told the Assembly.

Cllr Luxton disputed it had reached the end of its life, explaining that it was used only for access to the airstrip and not by heavy machinery.

Finding it hard to believe that he had heard the figure correctly, and wondering if he had possibly "dozed off," Cllr Gavin Short asked for a complete breakdown of the £9,800 to be provided to the Assembly.

FIG to pay costs to former employee

IN the Summary Court yesterday, the judgement of unfair dismissal of Kenneth Stewart by the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) was set aside.

It was agreed that FIG would pay an undisclosed amount of costs of the hearing to Mr Stewart, and that he would be barred from any further legal action on the matter. Crown Prosecutor James Paterson said FIG accepted responsibility for the delay in bringing the new information relating to the length of Mr Stewart's employment with the government to light, and that "actions were being taken to remedy this."

Mr Stewart's legal representative Keith Watson said the consented order had taken some time to negotiate, that it could have been settled some 5-6 months ago, and it had caused his client a great deal of stress and sleepless nights.

He said, however, that it was not uncommon for such matters

to be settled in this way. Mr Paterson said his comments were "fair and accurate."

Mr Stewart told the Penguin News that the outcome had not been exactly what he had wanted: "But the conclusion reached is in my favour."

On Monday, before Justices of the Peace Keith Biles and Ruth Taylor, Mr Paterson had requested an adjournment for an opportunity to review new information about the length of time Mr Stewart had been employed with government.

There was a need to be employed for two continuous years for a case of unfair dismissal to be brought, and this was in dispute.

Mr Watson read out two letters, dated January 2009 and December 2010, which had addressed the issue before the case had gone ahead, adding that the government had had ample time to consider whether it should have continued.

MLAs respond to state of the nation address

HEADING into the Budget Select Committee on Wednesday, chaired by Councillor Roger Edwards, Assembly Members responded to Governor Nigel Haywood's address on the state of the nation.

Focusing on education, Cllr Jan Cheek spoke of the importance of identifying special needs at the earliest opportunity. She said it was arguable that preventative measures should also be looked at, such as enhanced ante-natal care: "Our aim is for all students to reach their full potential," she said.

The move of the Museum to the Government Dockyard was a subject "close to her heart," and sharing the Islands' history could strengthen the right to self-determination as well as reach large numbers through tourism, she said.

Cllr Cheek said she was happy to be associated with several projects over the past year, including the smoking ban, succession planning and housing plot provision, and she paid tribute to the young people who had taken on extra work to fund plots rather than relying on government.

Cllr Sharon Halford said that while there had been a lot of criticism for the support given to FIMCo, it was "now showing its worth," and all involved should be congratulated.

Although she would like to have seen faster progress on a shipping link, she said it would not be

too long before there would be some options for consideration.

More public relations was needed, said Cllr Halford, with a more positive message being sent out, adding: "We need to be proud of our successes."

Cllr Bill Luxton said the rise in fuel costs was "alarming" and he was not convinced the best deal was being obtained from the monopoly supplier: "Monopolies are the curse of this country," he said.

It was "intolerable" that shipping and air links were subjected to arbitrary interference from Argentina and it was a matter "not of can we afford to do anything about it, but can we afford not to."

The idea of a single constituency did not curry any favour with Cllr Luxton, who said he hoped the idea was given a "huge kick in the backside" when the referendum was held later this year.

Looking back on the good fortune from the Illex fishery and other natural resources in the past year Cllr Dick Sawle, who is to represent the Islands at C24 this year, warned of complacency: "It would be unwise to think that we can sit back and relax and expect to be constantly rescued by unexpected good fortune," he said.

Referring to reviews of the economy and strategies now in place after many hours of meetings and consultation, Cllr Sawle said it was time to "to put the pens

away, roll up the sleeves and get stuck in."

The country needed to move forward and required change and growth to maintain living standards if the level of services to which we had become accustomed was to be maintained, he said.

It would need both government and the private sector to pull together as well as a "listening government" keen to assist and make things happen.

Reflecting on the work ahead within the Budget Select Committee, Cllr Roger Edwards it was important to ensure wise spending on economic development and investment in the Islands' future.

Typically supporting the manual workers, Cllr Gavin Short paid tribute to the quarry gang who had worked under huge pressure over the past year to meet the demands for materials from the MoD and oil related projects.

He also praised Power Station staff who had "moved heaven and earth" to keep the power on and, once the dust had settled, it would be time to consider buying a new engine, he said.

"The economy is still strong and the people are even stronger," said Cllr Short, adding that if there was the courage to make some bold decisions very soon, "we can drive our little country onwards and upwards."

Oil windfall boosts budget

PRESENTING his first surplus budget, Financial Secretary Keith Padgett said it was in no small part a result of additional revenues from oil exploration activities.

He said he had placed no reliance on future oil related revenue streams.

However, the "windfall" revenues from exploration activities had allowed him to present a budget that included significant economic investment proposals, in addition to maintaining existing levels of service wherever possible.

A budget surplus of £100,000 has been predicted for the forthcoming financial year from a total operating expenditure of £46.4 million.

Last year an operating budget deficit of £1million was forecast for the current financial year, and Mr Padgett was pleased to report that he anticipated a significant budget surplus as a result of investment, a relatively successful Illex season and income from oil exploration activities.

The proposed budget included carefully considered increases in

fees and charges, and incorporated expenditure proposals that would be linked to departmental business plans and the Islands Plan and, through those documents, progress and achievements would be monitored against planned targets, said Mr Padgett.

"The end result is the culmination of the whole machinery of government, working together for the benefit of our country and our community.

"I would therefore like to take this opportunity to say thank you to everyone involved."

Care inquiry

CHIEF Medical Officer Dr Roger Diggle this week said an external investigation would be held into the care of pregnant mothers and young babies at the hospital following the tragic deaths of two babies in recent months. The hospital's visiting gynaecologist will be carrying out the investigation, which also will look into general standards of care and future needs.

Stronger links

MEMBERS of the Legislative Assembly reassured the audience at Monday's public meeting they were committed to securing a containerised shipping link to the Falklands. Cllr Sharon Halford said she felt Argentina had done the Falklands a favour by being so stubborn on the issue because it had made the Islands stronger in their resolve to stand alone.

Midnight dip

TONIGHT'S midnight marathon charity swim will see 17 people swimming up to 422 lengths each, raising money for the Cancer Support and Awareness Trust and the IJS Parents' Association. Organiser Karen Lee said she hoped swimmers would finish before 10am tomorrow and supporters would be welcome through the night.

Raising the roof

SEA Cadets have received a donation of £1,000 from seismic vessel operator Polarcus. Chief Petty Officer Ken Newton said he was very grateful. The money would be used to repair the roof which was lost in recent storms.

Flock to fitness

HUNDREDS of people took advantage of free activities at the Leisure Centre on Wednesday as it hosted its annual Challenge Day to encourage the community to get more involved in sport and fitness.

Stanley Dairy inquiry reveals management and policy discord

THE Public Accounts Committee chaired by Stuart Wallace continued its investigation into the demise of Stanley Dairy last week by interviewing three former Development Corporation Board members in public.

Former councillor Mike Summers was an Executive Council member at various times between 2002 and 2009, when the Dairy was owned by FIDC, and also on the Development Corporation Board and chair of the Standing Finance Committee.

Former Councillor Andrea Clausen had also been a board

member of FIDC and chair of SFC for part of her term of office from 2005 to 2009.

Roger Spink had sat on the board as the Chamber of Commerce representative as well as stand-in for other private sector members since 2005.

Mr Spink told the PAC there had been a "failure of management," and "confusion on how the money was being spent on the dairy project."

Private sector members on the board had repeatedly questioned what was happening, but papers were put before Executive Council

without being viewed by the board right up until 2009.

Mr Spink and Mr Summers both said that even with a contract to supply products to the MoD, the viability of the Dairy had been in some doubt.

That the contract had not been firmed up was not unusual with the MoD, and many had not expected it to happen, said Mr Summers.

He said there had not been the same level of enthusiasm in mainstream government as FIDC, who had been more supportive of the old model dairy, but the advice

had been that that was "no longer workable."

There had been a "great deal of enthusiasm but a lack of scrutiny," Mr Spink said.

Mrs Clausen, however, did not agree that there had been more enthusiasm than attention to fundamentals, but she said there had been difficulty between policy makers and the board, with some members refusing to vote on issues because they did not believe the model would work.

By 2007 the board had not been running as well as it should, she said.

Islanders unite to remember Landing Day

RESIDENTS of San Carlos hosted the annual Landing Day Service for the first time on Saturday, attracting a good crowd of locals and military personnel.

After the Commander of British Forces last year indicated it would no longer be organised by the military, this year's ceremony was the first to be run by the local community, led by Sheila and Terence McPhee, Ailsa Heathman, Shelia and Ted Jones and Carol

Phillips. Ailsa told the Penguin News: "It was good to see HMS Clyde at anchor in San Carlos Waters and later to see a good number of the ship's company ashore. Together with MPA personnel from Headquarters, the Falkland Islands Support Unit, Joint Forces Logistics Unit and Expeditionary Air Wing, they swelled the crowd to nearly 180."

The act of remembrance at the British Cemetery was led by the

Reverend Richard Hines with the Bible reading by Governor Nigel Haywood, and assistance with prayers from Father Peter of St Mary's. Wreaths were laid by a number of officials and members of the public.

Afterwards everyone adjourned to a large tent, kindly lent and erected by members of the Falkland Islands Defence Force, who also loaned the urns that helped keep everyone plied with

hot drinks. A number of people also contributed food for the occasion, which guests and visitors tucked into while swapping stories from 1982.

The service was held on the 29th anniversary of day 50 of the Falklands War, when British troops first landed at San Carlos Waters. Rev Hines said those men who died during the landings had died in the cause of justice, freedom and peace.

Suspended sentence for driver already banned

"YOU are someone for whom the doors of the prison are gaping," Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis told Stanley man Michael Barry Hirtle (34) on Tuesday after he admitted drink driving and driving without a licence or insurance.

Mr Hirtle was picked up by the police in his father's Land Rover near Moody Brook on May 22. A breathalyser test gave a lower reading of 105mg per 100ml of breath, three times the legal limit.

Mr Hirtle was disqualified from driving for seven years in 2006 when he also served a three month prison sentence.

Defence lawyer Keith Watson said his client had no money so a financial penalty was not an option. However, he believed there was scope for the court to find an alternative to imprisonment that could possibly be more constructive, bearing in mind Mr Hirtle had not been before the court in more than four years.

Mr Trevaskis said Mr Hirtle's lapse after four years of compliance made his recent "unbelievably foolish" action more difficult to understand. An order of the court had been "flouted" and had to be regarded with a considerable degree of seriousness, he said.

Mr Trevaskis imposed a six month prison sentence, suspended for two years, for the drink driving offence and a three month sentence, also suspended, for driving while disqualified, to run concurrently.

He also extended his current driving ban by nine months, to end on September 24, 2014, and ordered him to pay £85 prosecution costs.

"You are a lucky man," he told Mr Hirtle. "Don't tempt the patience of this court again."

STANLEY woman Jennifer Helen Sanchez (30) was banned from driving for two years and fined a total of £979 after she admitted drink driving on May 18.

Miss Sanchez was spotted by police officers going down Philomel Hill at around 11.15pm without any lights on the vehicle and, when she turned into Crozier Place, her vehicle mounted the kerb and collided with a man leaving the Globe Tavern.

The court heard she had immediately stopped to offer assistance to the man, Jonathan Smith from Hillside Camp, and had co-operated fully with the police. Mr Smith was taken to the hospital and released later that night.

A breathalyser test revealed Miss Sanchez was almost three times over the legal limit to drive, with a lower reading of 101mg of alcohol per 100ml of breath.

Crown Prosecutor James Paterson said there were aggravating features as Miss Sanchez had been involved in an accident at a time when there was a high level of pedestrians in the area, and had

displayed an unacceptable standard of driving.

Defence lawyer Keith Watson said his client was devastated at her totally out of character behaviour, to such an extent she was still in shock.

Disqualifying Miss Sanchez from driving for two years, with a fine of £750, Mr Trevaskis said the levels were such that the court could have considered a custodial sentence.

She was also ordered to pay compensation of £129, the value of Mr Smith's damaged coat, and £100 prosecution costs.

A DRIVING ban was lifted for Stanley man John Morrison in the Magistrate's Court on Friday.

Mr Morrison is to have his licence returned in six weeks after Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis said he was satisfied Mr Morrison was as close as anyone could get to completing the equivalent of the UK's drink driving rehabilitation course with the local resources available. Mr Morrison was disqualified from driving for a year in October last year for a drink driving offence.

Mr Trevaskis said if every appeal to remove a disqualification was granted it would make a mockery of the system. However, Mr Morrison had "ticked all the boxes" in the six months since he had lost his licence.

Edinburgh's new watch

HMS Edinburgh left the UK on Wednesday to begin her journey south as the next Type 42 destroyer to patrol the Falklands.

Known as the Fortress of the Sea, the Edinburgh will call at the Cape Verde Islands and countries off the west coast of Africa before arriving in the Falklands later in winter, to relieve HMS York.

Meanwhile, there were mixed emotions in Portsmouth on Monday as HMS Gloucester, which was twice deployed to the south Atlantic over the past two years, sailed into her home port for the last time. The Fighting G marked her entry to the Naval Base in traditional fashion by flying a decommissioning pennant.

A few hours later, the ship that will take over HMS Endurance's role as an interim Antarctic patrol vessel entered the base for the first time. The ice-breaker MV Polarbjorn, to be named HMS Protector, will be deployed to the Antarctic in November.

Bridge builder Bill to take top MPA job

THE man appointed new Commander of the British Forces in the Falklands is the soldier who oversaw the bridge building in Cumbria following the county's devastating floods in November 2009.

Brigadier Bill Aldridge, the most senior soldier in the north west of England, was in charge of the region's military response to the crisis.

He described the operation to reunite the town of Workington via a military footbridge as one of the brigade's most important achievements of recent times.

He said: "The manner in which we were able to assist in the county's recovery has been particularly rewarding."

Brigadier Aldridge has been in post as Commander of 42 (North West) Brigade since September 2008, during which time he has overseen the deployment of reservists from the region to Iraq, Cyprus and Afghanistan.

"My new role in the Falkland Islands has a very real and present military mission and lies at the end of an extremely

Preparing for the 2011 NatWest Island Games

A TOTAL of 43 athletes will be competing for the Falkland Islands at the NatWest Island Games on the Isle of Wight next month.

The games start on June 25 and we are sending our largest team ever, nearly half of whom are represented in the football team.

One reason for such a sizeable football team is that they have three group matches to play in three days, likely to be followed by two other games, so they'll have five games in six days.

"It's pretty tough going," said Chairman of the Falkland Islands Overseas Games Association Mike Summers.

The football team will face the group games first and these will be followed by a series of play-offs to decide the position of the team overall in the competition.

There is also the Small Island Cup, which is presented by Patrick Watts, played between ourselves and Alderney as the two islands with the smallest populations of around 3,000.

But other sports clubs have been very active in recent years, and FIOGA has been encouraging people for quite some months to get into shape and consider the Games.

These are Mr Summers' first Island Games as chairman, although he has travelled to the event before. He also competed as a golfer in the last Isle of Wight Island Games in 1993.

In his role as General Team Manager he will be responsible for the whole team's administration and attend the morning General Team Meetings to liaise with managers of other island teams over issues that may be raised by our team. "If they have issues they need to raise, it's through me," he said.

Fundraising for the games has been on a massive scale: "The football club in particular has put in a lot of effort to raising money because there are a lot of them."

He says the badminton club

has had themselves organised for a pretty long time, and know what their obligations are and what they will be doing.

They are also going over two or three days earlier to do some training and adjust to the different competition arenas.

The main priority for Mr Summers as chair has been to acquire sponsorship to improve the funding of FIOGA.

FIOGA has had major sponsorships from government, Cable and Wireless, Stanley Services, Caribbean Alliance, FIC and a very significant donation from the oil companies, led by Rockhopper.

All this combined effort has made it possible for FIOGA to contribute £1,200 for each competitor going to the games.

This incredible investment in players is a much greater subsidy than FIOGA has been able to achieve in the past, said Mr Summers.

The assistance means that players concerned with the cost can breathe a little easier. The association has also organised a group fare flight with LAN for a slightly

cheaper airfare option. Mr Summers will be travelling on this flight with 17 other competitors on June 18, landing on the 20th and travelling to the Isle of Wight on 24th.

As well as the competitors there is hoped to be good coverage from the media, an aspect which Mr Summers believes is essential to the success of the Games. "The public here buy into the Games," he said. "They need proper coverage."

"I don't think it's fair that when people are basically putting their money towards them in various ways that they don't get proper coverage."

The newest FIOGA team member, capacity development intern Natalie Brett, as well as offering muscle-building training specific to requirements, is putting together a composite spreadsheet to set out who is doing what on particular days.

Not all of the information is available yet but it is hoped to get it on the FIOGA website.

The Falklands last medal came from the Island Games held in Guernsey in 2003.

Graham Didlick returned that year with a silver and a bronze for his pistol shooting, and Queen's Prize Pairs Gareth Goodwin and Chris McCallum took a bronze medal that year also. Kevin Clapp also was recognised for his golf skills in Aland in 2009 by the Small Islands certificate system which awarded him a gold standard.

FIG Environmental Studies Budget 2011/12

The Falkland Islands Government provides funding to help people in the Falkland Islands to conduct activities which benefit and enhance the environment. Anyone can apply for assistance from the Environmental Studies Budget (ESB), including owners and managers of land, non-government organisations and international scientists that conduct research and conservation activities in the Falkland Islands.

Projects eligible for ESB funding must assist in the management or enhancement of the biodiversity of the Falkland Islands. Priority will be given to initiatives addressing the key three themes of the 'Falkland Islands Biodiversity Strategy', which are: environmental research, on-ground action and education.


In addition to this, priorities identified at the recent workshop to review the Biodiversity Strategy are recognised as being of particular importance. These areas include:

- Coastal and marine species and ecosystems
- Biosecurity and invasive species control

The ESB has a formal application and decision making process with the Environmental Committee responsible for the allocation of funds. This year all the available funds will be allocated in one round in June 2011.

The deadline for applications is **Monday 13th June 2011**. The application form can be obtained from the Environmental Planning Department or online. Applicants are encouraged to discuss proposed projects with the EPD Environmental Officer prior to submission and he can also help draft your application. Where possible, some level of co-funding or in-kind costs (e.g. labour, equipment) is desirable.

Falklands species feature in the world's biggest wildlife website

STUNNING images of wildlife in the Falklands are featured on a website which has spent the past year profiling the Islands' rich and unique biodiversity.

ARKive (www.arkive.org) is an online initiative of the UK-based education and conservation charity, Wildscreen, which has recruited some of the world's best filmmakers, photographers, conservationists and scientists to create the "ultimate multimedia guide" to the world's endangered animals, plants and fungi.

Wildscreen publicists say powerful and emotive imagery is an extremely effective means of raising awareness of the plight of the world's threatened species, and gathering wildlife images and videos in its freely accessible digital library is a vital conservation tool.

The organisation has recently been focusing on the Falklands and the UK Overseas Territories, home to more than 250 globally threatened species, and it has created more than 220 "multimedia

species profiles" for animals and plants found within the UKOTs. Included in ARKive's vast collection of imagery are around 120 species from the Falklands, such as the flightless Falkland steamerduck and ground-hugging false-platann, as well as what it calls "some of the Islands' most charis-

matic and iconic animals" such as the rockhopper penguin and the South American sea lion.

Wildscreen also has created teaching resources for seven to 16-year-olds, including classroom presentations, activities and handouts, with teachers' notes as well as links to ARKive species pro-

files and scrapbooks. The activities, which are free to download, explore topics such as food chains, biodiversity and conservation, and feature many species familiar to the Falklands, such as the black-browed albatross.

Wildscreen's efforts to profile wildlife in the UKOTs are supported by Defra and the Overseas Territories Environment Programme, a joint programme of the Department for International Development and the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

The charity, which includes naturalist Sir David Attenborough among its patrons, says there are many ways to help support the ARKive project, from the contribution of imagery or the authentication of species fact-files, to the donation of funds, or by spreading the word so that more people become aware of the project.

ARKive's "unique audio-visual record of life on Earth" features more than 12,000 species, 70,000 images and 7,000 videos.

Seal of approval for new stamps release

The Southern sea lion (*Otaria flavescens*) features in the latest Falklands stamp release, which will be available for sale from Monday.

Adult males can reach up to 8ft in length, 5ft in height and weigh up to 700lbs, and colonies are known to breed at 68 sites in the Islands, mostly on offshore tussac islands.

They frequently feed in kelp beds, and sometimes prey on penguins, but their main food is octopus, squid, lobster krill and fish caught reasonably close to the shore. Sea lions themselves are preyed on by orcas and sharks.

However, numbers have declined dramatically since the 1930s, when more than 80,000 pups were born in the Falklands each year to a population of approximately 380,000. Since then

periodic surveys have confirmed a decline in numbers until the 1990s.

In 2003 a slight increase in the number of pups was recorded in comparison to 1995, but this still only represents 3.4% of the count obtained in the 1930s, meaning that the population remains alarmingly

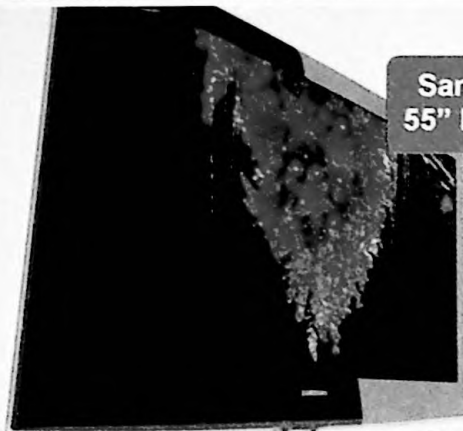
small. No clear reason for this has been determined, and the present population is considered vulnerable.

The decline in numbers, coupled with potential new threats from the fishing, oil and tourist industries, has highlighted the need for a conservation strategy for sea

lions in the Falklands. Accurate estimates of the size and distribution of the sea lion population is essential for developing these strategies, and Falklands Conservation, in association with the Sea Mammal Research Unit, has undertaken several surveys.

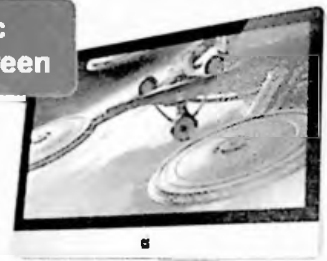

Department of Agriculture Wool Market Report 19th May, 2011

Tony Mills, Department of Agriculture, Falkland Islands
The EMI closes the week at 1361 AU c/kg (897 GB p/kg) which is a level close to that of earlier sales. Again this lift in the market is reflected in the individual micron categories even without the effect of the exchange rate.
Analysts' comments on the reasons for the bullish market still revolve around the positive supply demand situation i.e. weak supply versus strong demand. The mid micron ranges generally favoured by the Chinese buyers lead the market on its upward rise. Quality issues which are unusual at this time of year are still dogging the market better styled wools strongly contested.
Locally coring has been completed and I am sure all producers would have their wool on the market. I understand that some forward sales may be occurring or at least some tentative offers are being considered.
An interesting note from the Australian market is the difference in gross returns for some main micron categories. The national average per bale (185kg) for 19, 21 and 23 micron is AU\$ 2047, 1685 and 1473 respectively while for 28 micron it is AU\$ 767. On a cut per bale basis of 4 kg it is AU\$44, 36, 32 and 17. Food for thought in this day and age of high wool prices and favourable meat prices.

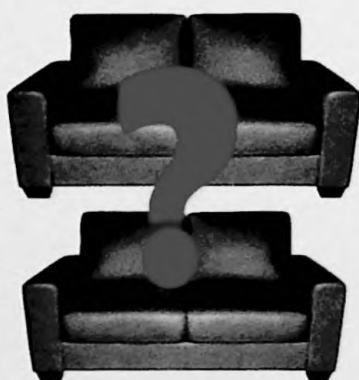

Q REFERRING to mail taken to Camp settlements: once mail is collected from the Post Office and delivered to a farm, does anyone have the right to withhold a recipient's mail?

The following response was supplied by Postmaster Moira Eccles...

A BECAUSE of the circumstances of the Falkland Islands, in particular in relation to Camp settlements outside Stanley, the community often relies on individuals not employed by the Post Office to help with the delivery of mail to others.

This reliance on individuals doing their best as volunteers should be met with reasonable expectations in terms of delivery of mail in these circumstances. However, no person who agrees to deliver mail to another has a right to withhold that mail.

In certain circumstances, it may even be a criminal offence to withhold mail which belongs to someone else.

If anyone has reason to believe that their mail is being withheld by someone else, they should contact the Postmaster for investigation of the matter.

Q THE Royal Geographical Society (with IBG) April 2011 magazine carried an article on Sea Level Rise which opened with the statement: "Global sea levels are unquestionably rising." For many years a tide gauge was located on the old Government Jetty; I think it is now on FIPASS.

From the information collected by this gauge, is there any indication that sea levels are rising in the Falkland Islands?

Findings of the tide gauges were published in 2010 in the Journal of Geophysical Research, Vol 115, as well as by FIRS and PN 15/10/10. Environmental Officer Nick Rendell provided a copy of the report from which the following conclusions were extracted....

A COMPARISONS between sea level measurements at Port Louis in East Falkland in 1981-1982 and 1984 and those made by James Clark Ross in 1842, have provided an estimate of how sea level has changed in the area over approximately one and a half centuries.

This provided a long-term rate form which data sought in February and March 2009 could be compared to.

The historic data calculated a long-term rate as being 0.75 mm/yr (after correcting for air pressure effects and for vertical land movement due to GIA), which is similar to that obtained over a similar period and using similar methods, at Port Arthur, Australia, in 2003.

This long-term rate is also similar to those observed in the North-

ern Hemisphere during the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The gathered Stanley sea level change data has shown a relationship between the Port Louis measurements during the early 1980s and those in 2009.

The figures suggest that the rate of change of sea level in East Falkland since 1992 has been approximately 2.5 mm/yr. This is further supported by satellite altimetry which puts the rate at a value of 2.79 ± 0.42 mm/yr over the same period.

Although the new measurement period was short, the average value of sea level obtained was an accurate one and infers that a relatively recent acceleration in the rate of sea level rise has taken place.

The 2009 data set has proved to be of greatest value as a means of combining the historical data from Port Louis with those from the permanent tide gauge station at Stanley, 25 km to the south-east. Such a relatively recent acceleration in the rate of sea level rise, from 0.75m per year to 2.5 mm per year, is consistent with findings from other locations in the Southern Hemisphere and globally.

Whether the high recent rate is some kind of decadal fluctuation, or is the start of an accelerated climate change, remains to be seen.

Port Louis is an environmentally pristine location, where the geodetic benchmarks from 1842 have survived in good condition.

The new 2009 benchmarks are likely to survive for many years to come, and the likelihood is that future measurements will be both feasible and scientifically interesting.

Q WHEN is Cable & Wireless going to get the caller ID fixed for Camp, as it has been off for months?

Sara Loftus of Cable and Wireless provided the following answer...

A The Calling Line ID service does not currently work on the 50% of Camp customers who are connected via WiMax due to a software problem on the telephone exchange.

This issue has been raised with our equipment supplier, who is including the fix in the annual software release. We are waiting for confirmation of the final release date but are expecting it in the next two months. Customers can still check the details of the last call by dialling 1471.

No Stanley or Camp MSAN customers are affected by this issue and Cable & Wireless would like to apologise for any inconvenience caused.

Q WHAT is government policy on sick leave and sick pay?

Answers to this and the following three questions related to sick leave issues were supplied by the Human Resources Department...

A FIG has a sickness absence policy which has been established to ensure that the matter is addressed consistently, sympathetically and fairly across the organisation.

It allows an officer to be granted sick leave if ill or injured provided that the illness or injury is such as to prevent the carrying out of duties and was not caused by self misconduct or by failure to take reasonable precautions.

Under the policy, full-time employees may be granted sick leave on full salary at the rate of 20 working days per leave year (the entitlement for part-time staff is pro-rated to reflect the hours they work in relation to full time employees).

Q IF a person is on sick leave and still on pay can that person then take up other forms of employment or self employment, however easy or difficult that job, and get paid for it?

A FIG's Management Code states the following in relation to its expectations in regard to officers taking up other employment:

"Officers are required to devote the whole of their contractual working hours to their duties.

Under no circumstances are officers allowed to undertake any private work or business enterprise during their contractual working hours.

Whilst on leave of absence, officers may not accept any paid employment without the prior written permission of the Chief Executive.

Outside of contractual working hours officers will generally be permitted to take part in small scale private employment or business enterprise which will contribute to the Islands' economy.

Officers must seek the prior permission of the Chief Executive, through their Head of Department, by giving written notice to the Chief Executive of any such proposed activities.

The Chief Executive will then decide whether or not there is any potential conflict of interest with the officer's duties and will give a decision, granting or declining permission, in writing, to the officer.

Undertaking such an activity without the Chief Executive's permission is gross misconduct and may result in the officer's dismissal."

As noted in these rules, an officer may not undertake other forms of employment outside their contracted working hours without prior approval from the Chief Executive.

In addition, where an officer is on sick leave, paid or otherwise, the usual expectation is that the time off work is being used to aid recovery and not for outside employment.

Q IF a person is seen to be doing this, what action if any does government take?

A WHERE there is a belief that an officer may be in breach of their terms and conditions of employment, or of any FIG rules and regulations, the matter will normally be taken up under FIG's Disciplinary and Capability procedure.

In such cases, the matter will be investigated and, where the evidence shows that there is a case to answer, a disciplinary hearing will be convened.

Depending on the facts established, the circumstances surrounding the case and the severity of any breach of the terms or rules, appropriate action will be taken.

Disciplinary action can include an outcome up to and including dismissal.

Q IF a person is on sick leave but not on pay can that person then take up other employment?

A PLEASE refer to the above responses.

Q FURTHER to the PN article of May 6 2011 "Councillors admit government broke its own recruitment law": when Chief Executive Tim Thorogood's contract was recently renewed, can FIG/EXCO confirm that this post was properly advertised as required by FI Immigration Law?

Also, does Tim Thorogood have a current work permit, - and if so, when was it issued?

According to Immigration law: "It is an offence to continue in, or take up employment without a valid work permit." If the CEO does not have a work permit, will he be prosecuted or deported?

Carolyn Montgomerie, the Head of Human Resources, provided the following answer...

A DR Thorogood holds a current valid work permit.

Members agreed at Executive Council on 10th June 2010 that the post need not be advertised locally prior to offering Dr Thorogood a two year extension to his contract. The Governor therefore directed the Principal Immigration Officer under s.17.7A of the Immigration Ordinance not to require that the vacancy be advertised. The work permit was subsequently issued.

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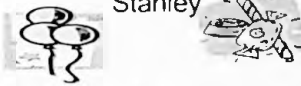

Riddle of Falklands wolf solved

THE warrah was the Falklands' only native land mammal, and for centuries there has been speculation as to how it reached the Islands.

Theories included the animals might have arrived on an iceberg, or that they might have come to the Islands with humans, perhaps as hunting dogs travelling on canoes with Fuegian Indians.

Another suggested that a fleet of Chinese ocean-going junks had visited the Falklands and that the warrah was a descendent of dogs from these ships.

Only recently, DNA studies published in 2009 showed it was unlikely for the wolf to have arrived in the Falklands through human agency, and the authors concluded that they arrived from the continent to the Falkland Islands either through rafting on drifting ice or dispersal over glacial ice during the late Pleistocene period.

During his time in the Islands, a young Charles Darwin developed an interest in the curious animal, even predicting its extinction in his *Zoology of the Voyage of the Beagle*.

As sheep farming became more established in the Islands, and some believed the warrah had "developed a taste for mutton" – disputed by others – a poisoning campaign was undertaken and many were destroyed.

By 1870 they were reported almost exterminated with the last one said to have been killed in 1876 at Shallow Bay, West Falkland Islands.

Dale's historic find of the millennium

THE remarkable story of the Evans Warrah has just become even more significant, with radiocarbon dating indicating that one of the bones is approximately 1,000 years old – confirming that the warrah predates by centuries the human settlement of the Falkland Islands.

In January 2010, while spending the summer holiday at his family's farm on the West, then 13-year-old Dale Evans discovered an interesting bone on the ground.

Being a natural history enthusiast since he was just three years old, Dale explored the site further and began to gather up the collection that now bears his name.

The blackened jaw and skull bones that had particularly taken Dale's attention were sent by the Falklands Museum to the Natural History Museum London for identification and were confirmed as being from a warrah – the "Falklands wolf" – a species that has been extinct for more than 130 years.

Now 15 years old and recently voted Prince Charming at the annual May Ball, Dale said he was focusing on his GCSEs for the time being, with the aim of eventually becoming an archaeologist or a marine biologist.

He said it felt great to have been responsible for such an important historic discovery, and he had not expected the bones to be any older than about 500 years.

Warrah remains are rare, with only six mounted specimens and a small amount of skeletal material known to exist.

All these specimens were collected by naturalists visiting the Islands during the 18th and 19th centuries. Until this discovery, no warrah remains were held in the Falklands.

It appears that the remains of at least six different warrah have now been found at the West Falkland site, with more than 100 bones being gathered.

The Evans family agreed that the warrah remains found by Dale should be held at the Museum in Britannia House where they have been displayed for all to see and appreciate.

Taking guidance from contacts at various British museums and organisations, the Museum and National Trust progressed slowly and carefully. The next step was to arrange for a further examination of the site.

Archaeologists Dr Robert Philpott and Dr David Barker, who have been carrying out survey work for the M&NT since 1992, were brought to the Islands with the assistance of a grant from the Shackleton Scholarship Fund.

The area was thoroughly mapped, and a considerable quantity of material, including more bones and soil samples, were gathered for further examination.

The latest step involved sending bone samples to Beta Analytic Inc, the world's largest professional radiocarbon dating service.

Two samples failed to yield collagen for testing, but the third was successful.

The calibrated result giving a 95% probability that the animal died sometime between AD 890 and 1010 (a conventional radiocarbon age of 1100+/-30 BP).

But Dale's work is still ongoing and, based on suggestions by Dr Philpott, he is trying to find out how the bones drift along the bottom of the lake and why they turn black. We've not heard the last from the budding archaeologist behind the find of the millennium.

I did not deserve her thanks. But those Islanders who respect the innocent victims of a war which will forever remain embedded in their heritage, most certainly do.

I hope I have helped add true value to the Penguin News through these and other reports. As long as some of them have provoked, inspired, engaged or impressed, I'd like to think I have done my job.

If you don't agree, write a letter to the paper. After all, a good newspaper is a nation talking to itself.

Passport stamps are a wild idea

VISITORS to the Falkland Islands now have new passport stamps to collect, thanks to a series of designs unveiled by the Falkland Islands Tourist Board.

Developed to give travellers a unique memento of their visit to the Falklands, the new arrival and departure stamps incorporate some iconic attributes of the destination's wildlife such as the Magellanic Penguin and Black-browed Albatross.

"It's taken a few years and many hurdles, so we are delighted to get the seal of approval and roll out the new stamps at our borders," said Paul Trowell, FITB General Manager. "The wonder-

ful designs will add collectability and creativity to such an important part of a traveller's memories."

The passport stamps were designed by Julie Halliday from Studio 52 and were given the go-ahead from the MLAs in November.

Robert King and the team at Customs and Immigration also had been extremely cooperative in the project, said Mr Trowell.

"This is just one initiative the Falkland Islands Tourist Board has been working towards over the past 12 months, and it is now gearing up to achieve the exciting and challenging objectives of the new National Tourism Strategy."

Technically a success

DESIRE Petroleum admitted this week it was disappointed with the results of its drilling campaign, but assured investors the company was hopeful of a change.

Desire Chairman Stephen Phipps said the group was pleased with the preliminary results of its recent 3D seismic survey and they anticipated good results when they were analysed.

"We were disappointed not to have found hydrocarbons in the 2010-2011 drill campaign but there is significant remaining potential in our licences," he said.

Two new wells, Beverly and Shona, offer Desire some encouragement. Mr Phipps said: "We are very keen to get back to drilling

and we're certainly not going to give up now." Shares yesterday stood at 13.75p, ten per cent up since Tuesday's announcement.

Meanwhile the only company to have any success in the region, Rockhopper Exploration, has seen its shares rise by 12.9 per cent to 260.88p in the same period.

The sharp rise is the result of news that their latest appraisal well discovered a significant reservoir package.

Following tests, they intend to drill another appraisal well, 4.2km west of the discovery well.

Rockhopper's chief executive, said it was an enormously encouraging result and testament to the quality of their technical team.

Budget proposals get the go-ahead from MLAs

AT Friday's Legislative Assembly Budget session Financial Secretary Keith Padgett reported that as a result of the significant efforts already put into the budget process, the Select Committee's deliberations were quickly concluded and the budget proposals were accepted without amendment.

Therefore the proposed appropriation remained unchanged at £45,466,270, and the budget surplus for 2011/12 remained at £101,650.

The Select Committee approved all the proposals on revised fees and charges as well as the proposals on pay, pensions, social payments and allowances.

The £10 million for capital expenditure programme included the following major allocations:

- £3.6 million for Municipal Services, which includes several infrastructure related schemes (including schemes related to water and electricity supplies and sewage disposal). It also includes a provision to fund the potential construction of a wind farm to provide electricity to the Mount Pleasant Complex.
- £3.4 million for Government

Land and Buildings, which includes further Abattoir improvements, the relocation of the Fisheries Department from unsuitable offices on FIPASS, and relocation of the Museum and part of the Public Works Department.

- £1.13m for Roads, to cover Camp and Stanley road networks.

No subsidy has been allocated for FIDC for the forthcoming year, since the Corporation is able to fully fund its operations from accumulated balances.

This represents a one-off saving, and annual subsidy allocations of £395,000 are included in the projections for future years.

£250,000 was agreed to directly support the agricultural community via the Farm Improvement Programme and other related schemes. In addition, an allocation of £1.7m was approved for the continued operation of the ferry and coastal shipping service.

In terms of the main subvention bodies, the following allocations were agreed:

- £438,000 as a contribution to the Tourist Board, to support investment in the promotion and development of tourism.

- £216,000 as an operating subsidy to FIMCo, to demonstrate the ongoing commitment of the Legislative Assembly to farmers and the meat industry.

- £159,000 to the Media Trust to support the Falkland Islands Radio Station, including £15,000 which will be made available as matched funding.

- £110,000 to support the Museum and National Trust, including £10,000 which will be made available as matched funding.

- £67,000 to support the work of Falklands Conservation.

Total departmental expenditure was agreed at £42m.

The three largest departments remain as Health and Education (with spending of £12.7m), Public Works (with spending of £8.9m), and Natural Resources (with spending of £6m).

Taken together these departments account for two thirds of projected departmental spending.

An analysis of the services provided by each department and a full breakdown of budget allocations will be available to the public when the Budget Book is published in the next few weeks.

MLAs overseas

MLA Roger Edwards is currently in St Vincent and the Grenadines attending the Caribbean Regional Seminar on the Implementation of the Third International Decade for the Eradication of Colonialism: Goals and Expected Accomplishments Seminar. He will be attending the Committee of 24, Special Committee on the Situation with regards to the Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples, with MLA Dick Sawle, on 21 June.

Midwinter dip

THE Midwinter Swim will be held this year at Surf Bay on the June 18. Participant registration is required, and registration forms are available from BFSIWEB, the Command Secretariat, Ext 6845 at MPC, and in Stanley from the Post Office, Saddle Direct and on mobile 51111. The Midwinter Swim is a popular annual event and is held on the Saturday closest to the Winter Solstice. The event raises funds for the Stanley Seamen's Mission and the Falklands Sea Cadets.

Health problem

HIRING a replacement CMO has been "quite a problem," DOHE David Jenkins told the Health and Medical Services Committee yesterday. An offer has now been made but contingency plans are being prepared should it not be accepted, and an announcement is expected next week, he said. Recruitment of a Chief Practice Nurse was in finalisation but the applicant had withdrawn, but seconding from an NHS hospital was a likely solution.

Credit for kids

AN amendment to the winding up of the Holiday Credit Scheme now allows participants under the age of 16 on June 30, to retain their balance until they reach their 16th birthday. They will then be allowed a year to either draw the full balance as a contribution to travel or take 50 per cent of it as cash.

Watt price

THE price of electricity increased from 19p per unit to 21p on Saturday, in line with budget decisions and as a result of fuel price increases. Pre-payment cards will be sold at a 10.5% surcharge over their face value.

Waiting times

WAITING time for a non-urgent but routine hospital appointment is 14 days. With only one dentist on staff the waiting time for an appointment is currently six weeks.

Fierce blaze destroys Ross Road garage

FIREFIGHTERS were out in force on Saturday morning attending to a fire on Ross Road East.

The on-call Fire Officer received a call at 8.36am and was on the scene just two minutes later to find the garage engulfed in flames, billowing out through the windows, doors and roof.

Station Officer Gerard Jaffray said the first fire engine with a crew of five retained and one full-time firefighter arrived at Cyril and Val Ellis' property at 8.43am.

The 23 firefighters dealing with the incident took just 44 minutes from the first call until they had the fire under control.

The garage and a container were destroyed.

"There was one explosion which was found to be an 11kg propane cylinder," said Mr Jaffray.

"How much was still in the cylinder is not known, but it was enough to make us jump."

Prison for 'Jekyll and Hyde'

A MAN who admitted assaulting his wife, using threatening behaviour towards the police and breaching a conditional discharge on May 28, was on Thursday sent to jail for three months.

Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis told Claudio Augustin Lautaro Briones Sepulveda that the "Jekyll and Hyde" example his defence lawyer had used was appropriate.

"Drink is not your friend, it's your enemy. When you drink you

turn into someone who is not you," Mr Trevaskis told Mr Sepulveda, who had punched his wife around the head and shaken her by the hair.

Mr Sepulveda when sober was remorseful and ashamed of his behaviour, his legal representative Graham Wallis told the court.

He said Mr Sepulveda had PRP and was anxious to gain employment when released and, although his wife had indicated that she wanted nothing more to do with him, it was not stretching the

bounds of possibility that they might get together again.

Mr Trevaskis, however, said he was not comforted by that thought: "The relationship is seriously flawed and does harm to both of you," he told Mr Sepulveda. "Unless you put some distance between you and your wife you will be spending more time in prison than at home." The conditional discharge remains in place until February 2012. No costs or compensation orders were made.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

SETTING a balanced budget was something of a relief but not a cause for complacency. The balance was achieved in part because of additional income from illex licences and oil exploration activity. Most members recognise that subsequent years will be more difficult. As costs rise and if income does not then clearly some expenditure will have to be cut. We did not want to make those cuts prematurely; apart from anything else there would be added costs to restore positions and services when the cash became available.

I'VE always supported the concept of a public accounts committee as a badly needed additional layer of scrutiny and I have already observed that its existence is making people pause for thought before launching into expensive projects for which they may be called to account in the future. If we do not learn from past mistakes we risk repeating them. It seems that the West roads "scandal" and the huge costs of recruitment will appear insignificant when we compare them with the apparently shambolic expenditure on the Stanley Dairy. I was unable to sit in on the recent public session but reading the lines (and between them) of the summary in last week's Penguin News indicates that the final report should be of great interest. It should not be forgotten that the cost of the inquiry, in particular the gathering and analysis of all the relevant paperwork, is also a cost attributable to that particular project.

I CAN assure your correspondents that the convenience for businesses was not by any means the principle reason for my support for the year-round summertime trial. That reduction in time difference was merely a coincidental benefit. I supported it because many people had said how much they disliked, and in some cases even dreaded long dark evenings while others said they would enjoy early evening walks or pottering around their gardens. I believe the main beneficiaries have been children who, even last week, less than a month from mid winter, were able to enjoy lots of healthy outdoor play instead of being indoors straight after school.

Environmental riches now enshrined in law

THE Commissioner for South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands, Nigel Haywood, signed the Wild Life and Protected Areas Ordinance for the Government of the South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands (GSGSSI) in a small but extremely significant ceremony on Tuesday.

The legislation includes protection of species from inhumane trapping and makes importing and releasing of non-native species illegal. It also gives the GSGSSI the ability to declare Specially Protected Areas (SPAs) or Marine Protected Areas (MPAs) on areas identified as significantly important for biodiversity.

The establishment of MPAs is in accordance with the 2002 World Summit on Sustainable Development and the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change.

Senior Executive Officer and Director of Fisheries Martin Collins said large areas around South Georgia were already protected by fisheries policies, and enshrining the policies in law would afford considerably greater protection on declared MPAs, granting powers of prosecution.

GSGSSI outsourced a legislative drafter and a policy adviser to

make sure the legislation accurately reflected management policies. But it has taken five years of careful consideration to finalise for signing.

"The legislation is intended to provide legal support for existing management policies rather than introduce new ones, so the changes will not be profound," he said.

Environmental Officer Darren Christie said invasive species threatening ecosystems was a global issue, although, since human landings in the late 1800s, invasive species had been limited in South Georgia (SG) by its harsh environment. Though situated

well below the Antarctic convergence zone, glaciers are retreating at 400 metres per year. The islands are heating up, encouraging increased populations of non-native species such as rats and reindeer.

This encroachment on the native and endemic species is particularly serious given the valued indigenous species. 11 of SG's 31 species of breeding birds are considered to be threatened or near-threatened species by the World Conservation Union. SG is also home to 7 of the 29 species of conserved Albatross and Petrels.

British Antarctic Survey recently completed the first comprehensive study of the region, revealing it, in terms of the number of species inhabiting its shores, as the richest area for marine life in the Southern Ocean. During breeding season it hosts the densest mass of marine mammals on earth.

Commissioner Haywood appreciated the ambitious project to restore South Georgia to how it was before human contact.

"It will take a long time to get it going, but if we can, it will be a great achievement for practical applied biology and part of its success would be from support of this legislation," he said.

Peter Dixon-Clarke, Finance Director for Rockhopper, introduced Development Manager Paul Culpin, who explained the many processes needed to extract and commercialise the oil.

It was also emphasised that the strategies explained were only generic solutions that could be put into plan when a commercially viable source was appraised.

Husband and wife on trial

The husband and wife team stand trial on a joint charge of rape of a woman, while Mr MacDonald is also charged with rape and threatening to kill the unnamed woman in 1975. Both defendants have indicated not guilty pleas. Mr MacDonald elected trial by judge.

At the moment Rockhopper Exploration is in an appraisal stage after it announced on May 6 a discovery at the 14/10-2 well on the Sea Lion prospect in the North Falkland Basin.

Considerations would then turn to how to store the oil after the correctly suited rig and piping were laid by specialist ships.

The most financially viable solution to this problem would be to store it offshore in a floating production, storage and offloading facility (FPSO).

The number of FPSOs required would not be accountable to an amount of rigs, but instead to the distance between the wells. In the case of a number of wells in a rela-

tively small area, coined as "satellite wells," they could be piped to an FPSO which in turn could offload the hydrocarbon product to another vessel.

At the forefront of the public mind was the recent tragedy of the Gulf oil spill. "This is unlikely to happen; a tragedy of hopefully only a 1-in-100 year occurrence," said Director of Mineral Resources Phyl Rendell.

It was explained that well rehearsed contingency plans would be utilised to combat disasters like spills, but no actions would be taken that did not satisfy the government as facilitator. "If no plans were in place we would not be able to drill," said Mr Dixon-Clarke.

Anne Addis died not knowing...

ANNE Addis died recently, not knowing what had happened to her son Alan, who disappeared at North Arm in the Falklands in 1980.

I met Anne a number of times, and on one occasion interviewed her at great length.

When a team from the Devon and Cornwall Constabulary went to the Falklands to search for remains in the early 1990s, I told her story on BBC World Service's Outlook programme.

I was always upset by the degree of suffering that Anne endured. But it seemed no one could help her.

It is well known that she believed Alan had been killed and his body disposed of in such a way that it might never be found. But no evidence of foul play has emerged.

Unless the police files hold facts unknown to me, it is possible – some would say probable – that Alan perished accidentally in the depths of the frigid winter waters of Camp that surround North Arm.

I believe Anne said recently that she had given up the search for her only son.

But while I am sure she no longer expected to find his remains, I think she would still have explored any avenue that offered the faintest possibility of an explanation.

Perhaps she knew she was getting older, and could not dedicate so much energy to her search. Alan's disappearance undoubtedly ruined Anne's life, but I was impressed by her dignity in spite of depression, a breakdown, loneliness and never-ending bereavement.

I believe and sincerely hope that the file on the missing Marine has not been closed.

The fundamental problem, however, is that it was never opened properly in the first place.

The initial military-chaired enquiry, a copy of the report of which I have seen, was conducted by people who happened to be in the Falklands at the time.

Although they tried their best, the depths of the mystery were such that they could not hope to make real progress before the trail began to go cold.

I want to write more about this whole strange affair one day. But today I am thinking more about Anne Addis, who really deserves to rest in peace.

Heavy hands not required

THE permanent EOD office in Stanley has, I believe, now wound down its work and moved to MPA.

That is surely a good sign, as fewer hand grenades and caches of

ammunition are now surfacing in peat sheds and on beaches. And, of course, demining has now started.

I was reminded of the Falklands EOD teams when I watched *The Hurt Locker*, a brilliant film about the remarkable men and women who tackled the improvised explosive devices – bombs to you and me – in Iraq, and do the same today in Afghanistan.

I cannot recommend this film highly enough. It is not, however, really about bomb disposal.

It is about the mental stress that such soldiers face.

Their turmoil, strife and damaged relationships have to be kept hidden (hence the hurt locker in which they are concealed).

The main protagonist appears to have abandoned any hope that he will live beyond his next bomb. Ripping off his protective suit, he says: "If I'm going to die, I'll die comfortable."

I was reminded of the British bomb disposal experts in the immediate aftermath of the Falklands War.

In 1982, the peril of booby traps, mines and unexploded ammunition was appalling.

We covered the stories of EOD for the Penguin News and, as the editor, I was often approached by the head of the unit, one Major John Quinn, who invited me along on bomb disposal trips.

His enthusiasm was contagious and I was happy to follow him almost anywhere.

One day, though, I became convinced we had gone too far.

His men had excavated a 500kg bomb somewhere near The Estancia, which had probably been dropped by an Argentine Canberra aircraft.

John descended into the pit, where the bomb lay on a bed of mud and sand bags, and beckoned me down too.

I slid into the pit with John and the bomb, and he began to work. It was relatively simple; no need to defuse it, he would blow it in situ.

As he prodded and kneaded the plastic explosives around the cas-

ing, I thought the bomb was rocking slightly.

"Erm... John, it is moving a bit, I think. Is that, um... OK?"

By any normal measure, it was not OK being anywhere within half a mile of this thing. But everything is relative.

He grinned at me over his shoulder: "Just so long as it doesn't stop ticking." He winked. There was no timer device in this, even I knew that.

I was, nevertheless, delighted when he and I scrambled out of the pit and trailed the detonator cable to an outcrop of rocks some 500 metres away, where we took cover and I was given the honour of "pressing the tit."

Penguin News work generally became safer as the years went by, but one was never immune from furious criticism or the heavy-handed pressure of government and establishment who thought they, rather than the editor or the readers, knew what topics should be reported and how.

I was happier facing them than dear old John Quinn's unexploded ordnance.

Bringing us right up to date, this pressure and interference is the same threat that faces today's Penguin News editor.

Tony Curran knows that the paper has to be brave; it sometimes has to poke parts of the community to get a reaction; it has to watch out for government

spin; print controversial letters and columns; and the editor probably has to forget about anyone in a position of influence uttering anything more than platitudes by way of thanks.

I'll thank him, though. Keeping this little paper true to its independent spirit is the most important challenge an editor faces.

Tony has done it well, and I wish him the best wherever his journalism takes him.

Goose Green gathers to reflect on occupation and liberation

REMEMBERING those who lost their lives in the battle for Goose Green on May 29, 1982, Islanders gathered at Para Hill overlooking Darwin and Goose Green on Sunday.

Appreciating the winter sunshine and calm conditions, those who were liberated by the 2nd Battalion of the Parachute Regiment recalled that it had been a similar day 29 years ago when they were released from the Social Hall after being imprisoned for a month.

As is tradition the gathering retired to the Social Hall for a buffet lunch and a sip of the warming toddy mixed each year and known as the "Harrier".

Inevitably the timing and the very familiar surroundings for many prompt memories both good and bad and stories are exchanged within the close knit community.

A party was held in the Narrows Bar later that evening for those remaining of the 114 imprisoned and their families.

Eric Goss, the manager at Goose Green at the time of the occupation addressed the gathering as he has for the last 29 years and this year Pat Gray and her daughter Johan Wilkinson had the honour of cutting the cake baked and decorated by Kevin Ormond.

The first liberation cake was cooked in the Goose Green galley by Gladys Robson between the battle for Goose Green and the surrender of the Argentines in Stanley and carried the inscription "God bless all British Forces."

Next year to mark the 30th anniversary of their liberation the Goose Green community of 1982 are planning a party at Goose Green after the memorial service.

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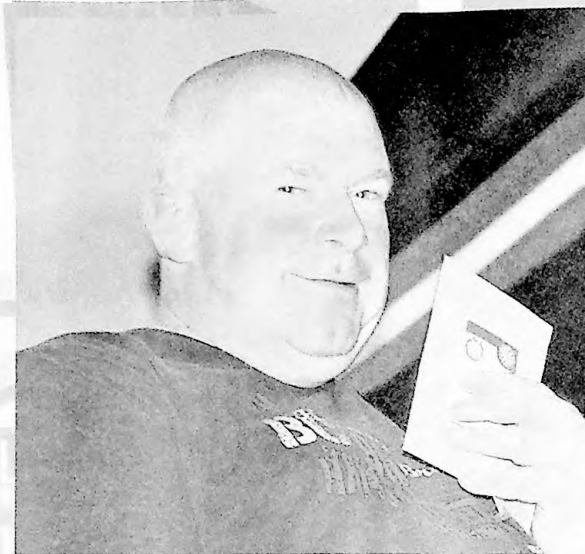
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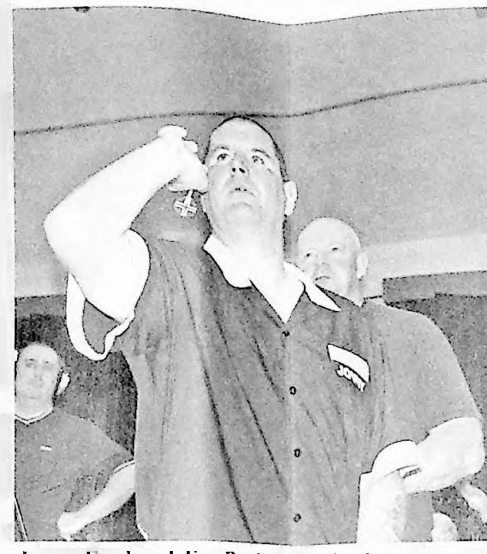

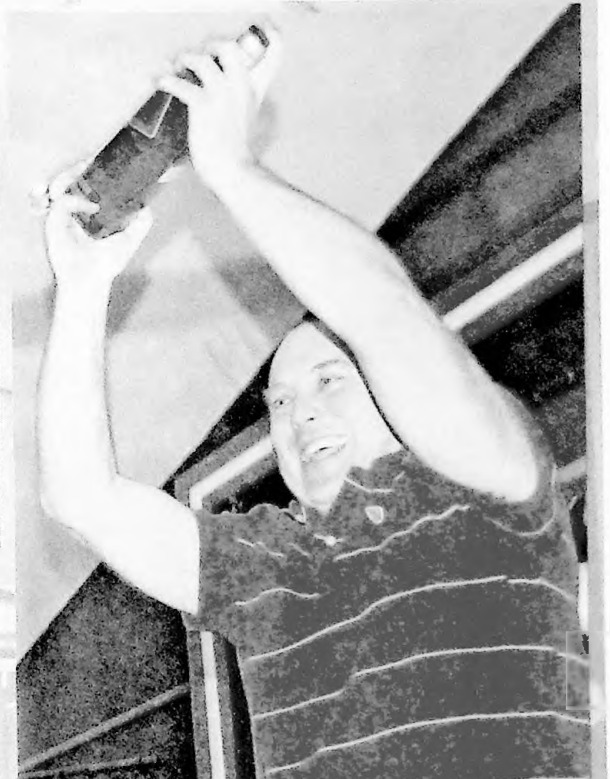

Department of Agriculture Wool Market Report 26th May, 2011

Tony Mills, Department of Agriculture, Falkland Islands

It is onwards and upwards for the wool market with the EMI closing the week at the season's record high of 1384 AU/kg (892 GB p/kg). This has occurred within a market where the supply and demand fundamentals remain unchanged and consequently are providing strong support to the market.

Mid micron ranges were the main beneficiaries of the price rises. The only sales that are bucking the upward trend are within oddments and skittings with VM and colour being the main reasons for discounts. The exchange rate is having an effect in some micron categories as underlying prices have either remained unchanged or lifted.

As I mentioned previously the majority of local wool is sold or offers are being considered. It does seem that VM and colour have played a role in this season's sales and may play an even more important role as overall clip quality improves. Forward sales may again prove to be a useful tool underpinning costs of production. Some tough decisions may need to be made on which lines should be pre-sold given that market analysts are not forecasting too much downward movement.

Forget the moral highground and 'grow a set' say frustrated voters

HEAVY expectations weigh on the shoulders of the five candidates in the forthcoming Stanley by-election as the electorate's impatience grows over the lack of progress in re-establishing a South American shipping link.

Hopes are now being pinned on the successful by-election candidate to push for a more aggressive approach against Argentina, and in particular the re-establishment of a shipping link with the mainland.

Islander Andrew Newman is extremely unhappy with current Assembly Members', "whole approach to the foreign policy."

He said: "Although Members keep saying they are doing a great deal behind the scenes, there's only so long that you want to hear it. I also don't believe the Foreign Office is doing anywhere near enough."

"First of all we want a candidate who will work to get more, and also something visible from the Foreign Office. We've waited long enough for something to be done and we are a heartbeat from the 70s communications now that SAAS has finished. Argentina is strangling us. Bo***cks to morale high-ground; where has that got us in the last decade? What we also need is someone in the Foreign Office to grow a set."

During a recent visit to the Falkland Islands an FCO representative spoke of the situation with

Argentina saying, "In the face of bombast you can show reason and humanity," however, his approach was met with cynicism from both young and older members of the community concerned with the negative effects on the Islands' industry of seeming inaction from the FCO.

Teresa McGill of local electronic goods shop Katronix says the lack of a shipping link with South America has greatly affected her and her partner's business. "People here often want items that can only be obtained in South America and we just

He commented, "I would like to hear their views on the type of contracts people are offered, particularly as regards to whether people should move here to work with their families or alternatively, commute."

Manager of Workboat Services Adam Cockwell said, "I think the biggest issue that this current council faces is the same that the previous one faced, communicating with the electorate."

"Irrespective of whether they are doing good work or not, nobody actually knows; and despite

say 'I didn't support this and if I had to vote on it in the future I still wouldn't support it.'

Sheila Stewart of Argos Fishing Company had parallel thoughts: "I'd like to know the candidates views on the current Legislative Assembly, and how they think they will do working alongside of them."

Jetty Centre employee Nora Smith and Regulatory Services employee Gerard Robson want to know candidate's views on the situation with Argentina; Nora disapproves wholeheartedly with any kind of contact with the country and Gerard thinks "they need to be hammered." On more domestic subjects Nora is unhappy with the recent time change.

"Government pay" was at the top of Mick Floyd's worries while John Fowler picked the subject of communications.

He said however, "There has been a lot of criticism of this Assembly and the previous ones regarding not communicating, but also they need to find ways of listening. Many claim to be speaking for the majority on many issues but they don't seem to have an efficient way of finding out what the majority really want; for example what exactly do we mean by 'self determination'?"

Nikki Luxton of Sulivan Shipping Ltd will be inclined to vote for a candidate with, "a positive attitude towards tourism."

This week Penguin News approached readers and asked 'What issues would you most like raised by Legislative Assembly candidates in the lead up to the by-election? Shipping links and seeming inaction by MLAs and the FCO came top of the list.

can't get them any more."

When approached by Penguin News with the question "What issue is close to your heart?" Simon Goodwin also quickly volunteered that shipping links was the issue everyone wanted to hear about.

Candidates should not restrict their comments to shipping, however. Falkland Islands Company Director Roger Spink, who is also Chair of the Chamber of Commerce, said he would be greatly interested in candidate's thoughts on "links with the rest of the world," but he also had strong views on Falkland Islands Government overseas recruitment.

the admirable efforts of Sharon Halford and her emailing of her constituents there doesn't appear to be any real attempt made to communicate with the public. They are disconnected from the electorate just as the previous lot were."

Mr Cockwell hopes to hear whether candidates agree with this view, and if yes, how they plan to deal with it. DESPITE an eight year time lapse since last joyfully brandishing the title of Editor, Penguin News, a quick run through of current political issues with the Deputy Editor last weekend left me reassured that while some stories may wax and wane the big ones never really go away.

In fact if editors of this paper ever sought reason to offer thanks to the Argentine Government it would be for their years and years of provision of material for this very publication.

As it happens none of us want a newspaper constantly quoting the 'A' word, but inevitably, and due to the ongoing effects of Kirchner's shipping decree on our industries, the subject is currently unavoidable.

So this week perhaps you will humour me and also forgive (or not, as the case may be) my musing that despite the stress and practical difficulties caused by their rude policies, there is a part of me that cannot help a wry preference for this blatantly aggressive face of Argentina, compared to the sneaky charm offensive offered up for so many years when I was last in this post.

This unfortunate situation is in any case inescapable due to our refusal to capitulate, and at the very least is an illustration of their desperation.

Whimsical thoughts aside, joining Penguin News shortly before a by-election was certainly timely – elections are an excellent time for newspapers, and a fresh interest in politics by the electorate leading to increased questioning of government policies is invaluable. As it happens, Media Trust policies prevent me from identifying specific candidates (or as we like to view them – targets) for derision or even congratulations. While it's a horribly dull approach, I accept it is also fair, and as fairness is a rare commodity in any part of life one should probably embrace it occasionally, albeit grumpily. Still, may I safely assume that being equally rude about every candidate falls within those rulings? Or alternatively their offerings to Penguin News (to be published in next week's edition) might be of such inspiring brilliance I may equally praise them with lavish superlatives?

Whichever the case and despite the undeniable complexity of the shipping situation I hope over the next few weeks they will not shy away from an issue that impacts in one way or another on our agricultural industry, our fishing industry, our retailers and consumers.

And if our candidates need any direction on an approach to political policy, I will say hand on heart that I have yet to meet one Falkland Islander who agrees with the Legislative Assembly's acquiescence to the FCO's 'softly softly' approach to Argentine interference in our shipping links – a point of view reflected clearly in our front-page story.

Ashy fog hangs over the Islands

AIDED by fog, the ash from Chile's Puyehue volcano hung in the air yesterday (Thursday).

A lack of analysing equipment means the Meteorological Office at Mount Pleasant cannot be assured of the exact density, weight and composite of the light ash-cloud but there is almost certainly no health risk associated with the slightly gritty air.

Chief Medical Officer Roger Diggle confirmed the low density of the ash cloud means it will have a very minimal physical effect.

"In Argentina, where the density would be considerably worse, it may cause respiratory problems. The quantities we're seeing here are no different than if you lived in a desert region and the wind kicked up the dust a bit."

Wearers of contact lenses may experience some irritation with the added grit in the air but the inconvenience will be short-lived and nowhere close to the thick, sulphurous smelling cloud that descended on the Islands in 1991 impairing visibility and covering livestock grazing areas.

Saunders Island got a covering on Wednesday. "The cows looked like they had a dusting of louse powder," said Suzan Pole-Evans. It was thick on the windows of the settlement from midday, but Suzan and her family hoped the mineral-rich sprinkling and recent rain would do the grass some good.

Disruption was mostly felt by those relying on aviation operations. Sunday's airbridge link from Brize Norton was cancelled to prevent damage to the aircraft.

Fine dust lays on all surfaces

CHC Helicopters had to delay their operations to support the Ocean Guardian oil rig. CHC's Base Manager Gerhard Pistorius confirmed that operations were postponed on Thursday due to both the ash and the fog. "We're erring on the side of caution," Mr Pistorius said, adding that the volcanic ash was a very abrasive material.

Island hoppers would have noticed too that FIGAS flights were cancelled on Thursday and Friday. Acting Manager Troyd Bowles explained that the flights would have been postponed because of the fog anyway, but they expect to be airborne once the predicted weather system pushed the ash through.

Elsewhere in South America flights from Uruguay's largest international airport and from Buenos Aires' busiest air terminals, that were to resume on Thursday, have been cancelled until further notice because of changing winds forcing the volcanic ash cloud to hover over the River Plate.

Yesterday the Met Office said disruption to the airbridge is expected to last for at least the next 72 hours.

"Resuming flying operations will be dependent on the latest advice from the Met Office on the movement of the ash cloud. The situation remains under constant review. The safety of passengers and aircraft is of paramount importance," said an MoD spokesperson.

"This situation is unusual and is likely to change at short notice."

Travellers who have a flight booked are advised to check the information line (7)4747 before they start their journey.

Obama slap for UK over Falklands

THE United States Government has signed a draft declaration supporting talks with American States over the sovereignty of the Falklands between Argentina and Britain.

The draft declaration on the question of the Falkland Islands was unanimously passed by the General Assembly of the Organisation of American States (OAS) at its meeting in San Salvador this week.

Nile Gardiner reporting for the Telegraph said it was an issue which had been heavily pushed by Argentina. In doing so, the United States sided not only with Buenos Aires, but also with a number of anti-American regimes including Hugo Chavez's Venezuela and

Daniel Ortega's Nicaragua.

The declaration calls for Argentina and Great Britain to enter into negotiations over the sovereignty of the Falklands and states 'It has not yet been possible to resume the negotiations between the two countries with a view to solving the sovereignty dispute.'

It notes that having heard the presentation by the Argentine delegation it welcomed the reaffirmation of the will of the Argentine Government to 'continue exploring all possible avenues towards a peaceful settlement of the dispute and its constructive approach towards the inhabitants.'

It also 'reaffirms the need for the governments of the Argentine

Republic and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland to resume, as soon as possible, negotiations on the sovereignty dispute, in order to find a peaceful solution to this protracted controversy.'

The declaration 'decides' to continue to examine the question of the Islands at its subsequent sessions until a definitive settlement has been reached.'

The Telegraph journalist, who condemns the signing of the declaration, describes this as a slap in the face for Britain, noting that President Obama was recently effusive in his praise for the 'special relationship' between the United States and the UK during his recent visit there.

Early oil talks

FALKLAND Oil & Gas confirmed on Wednesday drilling operations will begin in the first quarter of 2012 and revealed it is in early talks with firms interested in taking part in its exploration programme south of the Falkland Islands. The company however anticipated it did not expect to conclude any farm-out agreement until later this year. Separately, FOGI said it was planning to acquire some additional focused 2D seismic for its deeper Scotia and Hero prospects so that it can fine-tune the location of an exploration well on either of these two prospects.

Road repairs

A BID for capital funds in 2012/13 to replace the asphalt section of road at Sapper Hill is to be made. Spot patching is to continue for the time being. Consideration was given to removing the asphalt and using tillite capping, however DPW Manfred Keenleyside said that psychologically it was not good to have unsurfaced road directly outside of the town. Work is to continue on the Onion Range road at the request of the MoD. It is scheduled to start in October and is expected to take up to three months to complete the 1.3 kms.

Veterans at sea

FOUR EX-MARINES who took part in the hoisting of the Union Jack and removing the flag of Argentina at South Georgia during the Falklands' War are set to row across the Atlantic in aid of a Prostate Cancer Charity. The 3000 mile journey is expected to take the four men between six and eight weeks rowing 24 hours a day. The group will launch from Antigua.

Sailor's wheels

A VEHICLE provided to the Lighthouse Seamen's Centre by funding from The Seafarer's Trust of the International Transport Federation has proved, "extremely popular and very useful when it comes to offering lifts into Stanley for shopping or recreation purposes." Interim Co-Managers Luis and Betty Romo said, "Long may it serve the needs of seafarers and fishermen of all nationalities."

SAMA credits

MORE than 18 people have donated their Holiday Credit balance to SAMA 82 to date, chairman Gary Clement said on Wednesday. There is still until the end of June to sign over your credits to help 1982 veterans visit the Islands, he said, adding "thank you from SAMA and the vets."

Historic farm remains in Falklands ownership

THE sale of Johnson's Harbour farm has now been signed and sealed with Falkland Islander and Member of the Legislative Assembly Jan Cheek now the proud owner.

Johnson Harbour covers some 36,000 acres and includes Volunteer Point which provides an ideal habitat for three species of penguins including the Falklands' largest King penguin colony with around 1,300 adults, rearing about 400 chicks each year and attracts a large amount of tourists.

Mrs Cheek said she would be leasing out the farming operation and running the tourism side of the business herself, with a warden employed at Volunteer as in the past.

Islander and contract shearer Lee Molkenbuhr and his partner Martha Brown who has worked

for six seasons with the shearing gang are returning to the Islands soon after their wedding in August to take up the lease.

Miss Brown said they were really excited at the prospect of taking on the farm and would be making plans once they had had a good look around the property.

The former owner Mr Osmond Smith will still have a house at the settlement, which Mrs Cheek described as "very attractive and unspoiled," with the remaining buildings being split between the farmers and the new owner.

Mrs Cheek said she hopes to maintain the traditional appearance of the settlement which has a "fascinating history" and was very happy to have kept the whole farm in Falkland Islands ownership. This had been her principal aim, she said, along with maintaining access to

Volunteer Point.

There are no major changes planned for the forthcoming season, prices will be the same but usage will be monitored, particularly the management of convoys of vehicles with large numbers of tourists on busy cruise vessel days.

Tour drivers will be asked to brief their tourist passengers en route, something most do anyway, as a matter of course, she said. After a season's monitoring and in discussion with the Volunteer warden, Mickey Reeves, she would have a better feel for what was required in the future.

The good news for tourist drivers is that Mrs Cheek plans to invest some of the tourism proceeds into improvements to the 10 mile track from Johnson's to Volunteer as soon as possible.

Industries look at 'localisation' at Mount Pleasant

MEMBERS of the Development Corporation (FIDC) and the Chamber of Commerce (CC) have met with the Ministry of Defence with a view to building a business relationship that could benefit all parties.

CC representative Roger Spink said it was about building a rela-

tionship and getting it to work, while Development Corporation General Manager David Waugh added that there was a need to be reactive to issues and opportunities that might arise. Mr Waugh also noted in his activity report that one of the essential ingredients to successfully delivering sus-

tainable economic growth to the Islands economy is a strong and effective partnership between the private and public sectors.

Meetings between FIDC, FIG and CC were underway, he said to look at opportunities offered by the proposed partial "localisation" of MPA.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

SOMETHING that has been a worry for many years is the apparent falling away of parental involvement and interest when pupils move into secondary education. A recent example was a parents' evening with only half a dozen parents attending. The benefit of active parental interest and encouragement is well proven. I know that parents of teenagers tread a tightrope between accusations of too much pressure, which can also be counterproductive, and of not being interested if they back off. Everyone wants the best for our young people and that can only be fully achieved by working together. I do not believe there is a parent out there who does not want their child to achieve their full potential so I would urge them to work with the school and teaching staff who unquestionably have their best interests at heart.

EVERY pupil learns in a different way and last week I attended a presentation by staff on some great work they have been doing with individuals with very particular learning difficulties. It is all too easy to assume that all that is needed is extra one to one time, but sometimes it takes a long time to find the key that unlocks learning potential. We take simple verbal communication for granted from an early age, but for some it is an almost insurmountable hurdle and a bar to learning.

AS members head off to the UN and other international meetings it is necessary to reiterate our clear message of the right to self determination and that our country belongs to the people who live in it. No amount of hot air generated elsewhere changes those facts: we just have to keep new people informed.

OTHERS are on their way to compete at the Island Games, another great opportunity to fly the Falklands' flag and inform others about us. I have been impressed by the amount of dedicated training undertaken by the various groups of sportsmen and women, probably more across the board than for any previous games. I wish them well and know they will be great representatives for the Islands.

Tests show hydatid still present but at low levels

A WORM that causes hydatid cysts in dogs, but also very occasionally in humans, that should in theory have been eradicated by systematic dog dosing is "fairly unequivocally still present in the Islands."

Fortunately the presence is low (1.4% of dogs tested) confirmed Falkland Islands Government Veterinary Surgeon Zoe Luxton.

Ms Luxton made the statement in response to questions submitted to Penguin News by a concerned farmer, Neil Goodwin, who demanded to know what the point was of having strict rules relating to dog dosing, if they did not work.

He also asked why dogs found to test positively to *Echinococcus granulosus* (EG) had not been "put down."

Ms Luxton said, "Reasons for the continued presence of the tapeworm in the Falklands could include the cycling of the worm through an unknown intermediate host or the breakdown of the treatment cycle somewhere (access to a cyst in a dead sheep in a paddock or dogs vomiting the pills up after treatment for example)."

She said, "It is known that tapeworm eggs passed out with the faeces of dogs can remain viable for several months and may be for as long as two years in a suitable environment. Resistance of the worms to droncit/drontal is not known to occur but all these factors must be considered in the future plan to eradicate this parasite from the Islands."

She also noted there was absolutely no reason to euthanize dogs that tested positive because "These previously positive dogs would almost certainly test negative now. It is very unlikely that they are persistently infected with the hydatid tapeworm given that there has been subsequent dosing. What these tests prove are that there are still EG lifecycles occurring and at the point of sampling

in September 2010 there were EG tapeworms present in these dogs. Positive dogs are not infected for life."

Speaking of the tests that revealed evidence of the worm, Ms Luxton explained that in September 2010 every single dog in the Falkland Islands was tested with the hope that, "...no current worms in dogs coupled with extremely low numbers of cysts being found only in older sheep via the abattoir would mean that hydatidosis was eradicated from the Falklands."

She said before the Veterinary Department sampled the dogs, "we missed a dog dosing to make it as likely as possible for us to find any evidence of EG still being present in the Islands. Then all dogs were dosed as normal from October onwards."

Five hundred and sixty eight samples of dog faeces were sent to a laboratory at the University of Salford for initial testing followed by DNA testing where two of eight positive results were shown.

Ms Luxton said, "The current situation is that we have been in contact with the owners of the positive dogs and are collecting more pre and post dosing samples.

The samples should now be seen to be negative as dosing has occurred since the sampling in September."

She explained, "We have spoken to the owners of the positive dogs to get a detailed understanding of where the dogs go, what they eat and how they are dosed and if they ever vomit after pilling."

The department is also in consultation with the laboratory and parasitologists for advice and "to see if we can get sequencing done on the remaining six positive samples."

When the department receives the re-sample results and has completed its consultation process they will formulate a plan for continued work towards the eradication of EG.

In the meantime dog dosing will continue every six weeks as normal. Dog owners are advised to take normal hygiene precautions such as washing hands well after handling their dog and poop scooping.

Ms Luxton said, "The KEMH has invited the owners of the positive dogs to present themselves for a blood sample which will determine if they have been exposed to EG at any time."

The cycle of the hydatid worm....

THE basic lifecycle of the worm is between dogs, which are the final host and the animal in which the adult worms live, and an intermediate host in which the cysts form. The intermediate host can be ruminants, pigs (very occasionally) and man which is why it is important to try to eradicate it, as a cyst in a person can make them ill. To become infected a dog has to eat a cyst that has formed in an intermediate host. The larval stages of the worm that are in the cyst then develop into adult worms in the dog's intestine. Worm eggs are then passed out in the dogs faeces and then when a sheep (or other possible intermediate host) eats these eggs a cyst forms in them and so on. It takes between 40-50 days for a worm to develop to adult in the dog which is why they are dosed every six weeks - so that any life cycle that is in progress is treated.

Ferry runs, sea truck trials and island shipping issues

WITH Port Howard terminal completed earlier this year, Concordia Bay is no longer operating an interim service and it had made the expected difference with the wool and livestock season going "very well," said Workboat Services manager Adam Cockwell.

To supply the outer islands WBS will continue to look for possible landing options, in conjunction with government officers.

More than 1,600 passengers had been shifted between East and West with 92 per cent of voyages on time, but problems still existed with some of the islands, he said.

PWD's Chris McLean and Mr Cockwell plan to visit Lively Island in the near future in the hope that a cheaper alternative to the planned sea truck ramp might be

found. Director of Procurement and Efficiency Andrew Lee said that if the work came in under budget, it would allow other work to be carried out elsewhere.

At Saunders Island gabion baskets and other materials had been supplied for the owners to stabilise the sides and improve on the ramp they had already built themselves.

While weight limit issues still surround the use of sea trucks which are awaiting suitable conditions for trials, they can still be used within the current weight guidelines and are used to supply George, Speedwell and Barren Islands in Falkland Sound.

Unfortunately the shallow beaches of the Sound islands do not lend themselves well to land-

ing vehicles, and plant and discussions are ongoing with the MoD, the islands' owner Chris May and Morrison (Falklands) Ltd to get machinery onto the Islands. "All are committed, but we are unable to get dates," said Mr Lee.

Meanwhile at Sea Lion Island with work on the Gulch landing stage complete, it had, "reverted to the difficult place it always was, rather than the impossible place it had become," said Mr Cockwell.

The ramp at Bleaker Island drew praise from several members of the committee.

Councillor Sharon Halford said it was a pity there were not more people who were prepared to put in the same amount of self help as the Bleaker residents had with very little machinery available.

West danger spots highlighted

GRADING of the West Falkland road network is planned with a team on site for the entire season based at Hill Cove and Fox Bay.

This was welcomed by committee member Bill Pole-Evans who said there were some sections which had not been graded in four years.

FIDC general manager David Waugh put Windborne Valley forward as a priority for remedial work as it was causing problems with moving livestock to Port Howard for onward transportation to the abattoir. He said it was important to FIMCo and West Falkland farmers and asked

that it be "sorted by Christmas if it was humanly possible."

Bill Pole-Evans put his case forward for Carew Harbour which was a dangerous piece of road and was ongoing because it "just never got done."

The committee agreed safety issues were a priority and recommended remedial works at Carew Harbour, Wall Stream and Windborne Valley as well as a worn area in the Saddle area should resources allow.

Cllr Halford said there may be extra people who could do some spot capping as a self-help project and suggested interested parties request costings to "see if it was feasible."

East road works focus on Stanley to MPA

THE Transport Advisory Committee (TAC), on advice from member Ted Jones, who highlighted some problem areas on East Falkland, agreed that in some areas the use of coarser material to improve traction would create a safer, albeit rougher ride.

The TAC agreed that focus must be on the Stanley to MPA road, as without it, and associated expenditure, the road would become dangerous and affect the greatest amount of road users.

The seven year capping programme for East Falkland had slipped by a year due to operational priorities and there was still 3.9 kms to complete on the New Haven road using the mobile crusher at Salinas Beach.

The Gypsy Cove road is to be capped with 2,200 tonnes of planings (removed from MPA runway) covering 1.2 km and work is ongoing on the Tip Road.

The replacement of five gates with cattle grids on the Greenfield

link road to aid free passageway on the primary network was met with some opposition from committee members. Cllr Halford said fencing could be used in some places as other farmers had done, to do away with cattle grids and all agreed that grids should not be put in place until the connecting fences were complete.

The committee approved that tenders for cattle grid works should be separate for East and West and be set for four years.

He said they had been moved by the very touching expressions of sympathy and sent their kindest regards and regrets at not being at the service. "They thank you also for the comfort they derive from this symbol of a life well fulfilled, but so cruelly cut short."

The service, led by Reverend Richard Hines was attended by Islanders, local farmers who assisted the troops and former Royal Marines.

Farm improvement benefits everyone says Senior Ag Advisor

FUNDING for farm improvements benefits the entire community through boosting the Falkland Islands Meat Company's (FIMCo) profitability says Senior Agricultural Advisor John MacArthur.

The head of the Department of Agriculture confirmed that 26 farms had applied for Farm Improvement Plan (FIP) funding, "which farmers must match with a minimum of 25 per cent of their funds."

Commenting on the applications for the 2010/11 financial year, he added, "As many farms invest well over this amount the total amount invested by farmers in farm development was approximately 61 per cent."

The FIP programme, originally the pasture improvement programme (PIP), was developed to assist Falkland Islands farmers to develop and improve their farm productivity by planting crops and re-seeding (improved) pastures.

Through approval by the Agricultural Advisory Committee (AAC) the programme has been modified in recent years to include purchase of improved genetic material such as performance tested rams and semen from genetically superior bulls and rams.

It now also includes ditching,

required by farmers to reduce loss of livestock, and fencing material so camps can be divided and so that improved rotational grazing management practices can be introduced.

Mr McArthur said, "The majority of these farm improvement practices are targeted at producing increasing numbers of lambs, mutton and beef for FIMCo to process which benefits the whole of the Falkland Islands community."

"This is through having superior fresh meat products available in the supermarkets as well as bringing in much needed overseas income from exported meat to boost the Falkland Islands economy."

"In the early days of the PIP scheme, as agriculture was developing, FIG invested the total amount as long as farms could show a 3:1 return on investment over ten years."

"Things have changed significantly," said Mr McArthur, "with greatly improved livestock numbers this year, well above ambitious targets set, boosting FIMCo's output and profitability and as a consequence improving the whole Falkland Islands economy and benefiting both the Stanley and the camp community."

Falklands enjoyed at Californian show

FALKLAND Islands land-based travel piqued the interest of visitors to 'Chile Road-show' in March.

The show is organised by travel company Latour, part of Isramworld, one of America's largest tour operators.

Tourism Marketing Officer Louise Taylor presented the Falkland Islands as a holiday destination as part of the road-show that travelled along the Californian coast from San Francisco to San Diego, making a total of eight

breakfast and evening presentations to US tour operators.

Attendees ranged in numbers from a minimum of 17 to a maximum of 90. Total attendance across the road shows was 384.

Mr Trowell said, "The Falklands presentation focussed mainly on land-based travel but also made reference to cruise options."

"It followed presentations from Chilean operators; the Falklands were suggested as an add-on to a South American itinerary and as a destination in their own right

"Around a quarter of the attendees showed an interest in the Islands (based on the number of business cards received).

"A few individuals had visited by cruise ship and were enthusiastic about their time in the Falklands."

"A number of favourable comments were received about the presentation itself and many people commented that previously they had known little, if anything, about the Falklands and were interested to learn."

Mild May

MAY had milder than average temperatures, but was duller and wetter than normal.

It was in fact the fourth wettest and third windiest May since 1987.

The mean maximum temperature was 7.8 C compared with the long term average for May of 7.1 C.

The highest temperature recorded was 11.7 C on the 17th, and the lowest maximum was 3.2 C on the 22nd.

The mean minimum temperature was 2.7 C, milder than the normal 2.2 C average for May.

The lowest minimum was -1.9 C on the 23rd and the highest minimum was 7.3 C recorded on the 17th.

The total rainfall for the month was 67.9 mm, markedly wetter than the May average of 50.2 mm.

The wettest day was on the 21st with a total of 10.9 mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 23 days, and 1.0 mm or more fell on 15 days.

There were a disappointing 76.7 hours of sunshine, compared with the monthly average of 83.1 hours. The highest daily total was 7.2 hours on the 20th.

There were six days with sleet or snow, of which two days saw snow lying. There were two days of hail, no days of thunder, and six days of fog.

The monthly mean wind speed was 15.3 knots, which is slightly higher than normal, the May average being 13.5 knots.

The highest hourly mean speed of 44 knots occurred on the 27th, the highest gust of 62 knots being recorded at the same time.

Gales occurred on eight days, and there were 23 days with gusts

South America cruise vessel operating costs 'unbearable'

CRUISE vessel operating costs in South America are becoming unbearable according to company representatives speaking at the South America Seatrade Conference.

Tourism Coordinator for Sullivan Shipping Ltd, Samantha Marsh, who attended the two day conference in Sao Paulo, said, "It was a great opportunity to hear opinions from other ports and regions as well as the cruise lines. The challenges of operating in the Southern Cone were discussed at length, with infrastructure and excessive costs being recognised as the biggest obstacles to the regions growth."

"According to many of the cruise lines, operating costs in South America are becoming unbearable. Chile, due to a presidential decision has already begun reducing costs,

and is working hard to show their commitment to the cruise ship industry."

She noted there were several companies that no longer operate in South America due to the costs

of operating in the region, such as NCL (Norwegian Cruise Lines) which visited the Falklands on average eight times a season. On a positive note she said the Southern Cone was deemed very high in terms of customer satisfaction.

Ms Marsh added, "South America is seen as an area of great potential and may be one of the fastest new growth regions due to its diverse and attractive ports of call. There are many challenges ahead and the Southern Cone will need to work together to address the issues in order to become globally competitive."

She concluded, "The conference was deemed a success by all who attended; a wide variety of subjects were discussed, including infrastructure, terminal facilities, port costs and developing the industry further."

No more Miami for Tourist Board

THE Falkland Islands Tourist Board (FITB) is unlikely to continue attending Cruise Shipping Miami (CSM) but instead intend to fly the flag at Seatrade South America.

The decision was made by FITB Manager Paul Trowell following a verbal debrief by Tourism Marketing Officer Louise Taylor after attending CSM in March.

Mr Trowell said FITB is looking to attend Seatrade South America: "The source market could be one of the fastest new growth regions. Not only do they offer some of the most exotic cruise destinations in the world, but the economic growth in many South American countries is fuelling optimism for sustained cruise market growth across the continent... This will allow FITB to be present and network directly with key players in this region of the world."

Heavy fuel ban: IAATO predicts Islands' visitors to drop by 24 per cent

A TWENTY four per cent decrease in visitor numbers to the Falkland Islands in the first year of the heavy fuels ban was predicted at the latest meeting of the International Association of Antarctic Operators (IAATO).

Falkland Islands Tourist Board Manager Paul Trowell who attended the meetings in Hobart, Tasmania in May said the issue was one of the most important discussed in relation to the Falkland Islands.

The ban imposed by the International Maritime Organization becomes law on August 1, 2011.

Essentially the ban will affect the large cruise-only vessels rather than the smaller expedition ships.

The smaller ships use light marine gas oil, which is less harm-

ful than many fuels and dissipates quickly in water, posing less environmental damage in the event of a leak.

In 2005, the Antarctic Treaty Parties requested that the IMO restrict use of heavy fuel in Antarctic waters due to the risk of an oil spill in the event of a collision with an iceberg.

Mr Trowell said, "The attendance at IAATO this year was beneficial in terms of networking and building on the relationship with key IAATO operators whom visit the Falkland Islands."

The conference also considered issues including the review of incidents, compliance mechanism by-law, South Georgia, accreditation and auditing, environmental protection and land-based issues.

Edinburgh steams south

HMS Edinburgh is currently steaming south for a seven month patrol of the Falkland Islands and South Georgia.

The vessel will call into the Cape Verde Islands and other countries off the West coast of Africa on her way to the Falklands.

The Type 42 destroyer has recently undergone maintenance and Sea Dart missile testing.

On completion of her tour in the South Atlantic Edinburgh will carry out a number of high profile regional engagement visits in South America, the Caribbean.

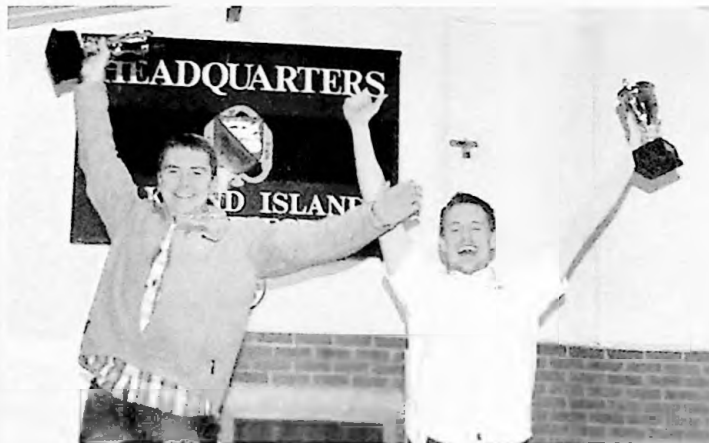

Department of Agriculture Wool Market Report 2nd June, 2011

By Tony Mills, Department of Agriculture, Falkland Islands

A NEW record EMI of 1398 AU c/kg (907 GB p/kg) was set with the final day of sales this week. Analysts state that there were no discernible changes to the underlying market fundamentals with strong demand and competition from China, Europe, Taiwan, Korea and India.

Substantial price gains were made within the mid micron ranges as can be seen from the week on week price changes for the 20 – 24 micron categories below. This week saw an improvement in the quality of wools on the back of new season wools being brought to market. Oddments prices were also more positive this week due to improvements in the styles on offer.

Talking with some producers this week it seems there is a continued improvement in the micron profile of their clips. Given the boost in prices seen throughout this season, it is a prime time to capitalise on the hard work that is needed to reduce micron without affecting the other important aspects that make you money.

Selling all manner of clothing, books, toys and household goods, donations are always gratefully received with all money going to good causes, the next of which will be Children's Hospices UK, he said.

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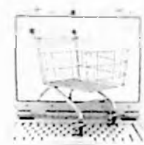
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Eight planning applications reviewed at June meeting

THE June meeting of the Planning and Building Committee was chaired by Councillor Sharon Halford and supported by Councillor Jan Cheek.

Environmental Planning Officer Antony Payne gave his apologies due to his absence on leave and his place was taken by Fiona Wallace-Nannig. Two lay members also apologised for not attending: Heather Norman and Jacky Cotter.

This month the committee were to review eight applications for planning permission, two of which were for such permission in principle. Conditional consent was granted for all eight and details of these are as follows:

- Outline application for dwelling in west part of garden at 7 Moody Street with drive access off Brandon Road for Ben Watson.

- Outline application for dwelling in west part of garden at 5 Felton Court for Alistair Wilkinson

- Retrospective application for construction of breakwater, dig-

ging out of beach below water line, and installation of steel pipes for a private mooring facility near to the west bunker at the Canache for Shane Clarke.

- Erection of a 5m x 19m poly-tunnel at Government House gardens for Government House.

- Siting and upgrading of a container for use as a shed at 13 Sullivan Street for Stephen and Rose Toolan.

- Detailed plans for a dwelling to be erected in the south part of garden at 10 Dairy Paddock Road for Ralph and Leeann Harris.

- Extensive works to the Sand Bay Abattoir at Sand Bay for the Falkland Islands Meat Company which include the erection of two chillers, enlargement of skins processing and holding area, installation of a water tank and the upgrading of slaughter hall areas and lines.

- The change of use of site from offices and workshops to museum complex/heritage site at the Dockyard on Ross Road for

the Falkland Islands Museum & National Trust.

This last application generated a lot of discussion and it was agreed that whilst the change of use could be approved, much further details were required to be submitted for the approval of government officers prior to the opening of the site in its new form.

Building Adviser Nick Stephens then further advised on the list of applications for building permits, noting that two more had been received for which he was awaiting further information.

The committee moved on to consider the Canache Management Plan Public Consultation Results and reviewed a paper which summarised the findings of a public consultation undertaken by the Environmental Planning Department from the March 16 to April 15, 2011. The committee noted the results of this and agreed with the several recommendations as set out in that paper.

Briefly, these came under the

following headings:

- The role of the Canache.
- Permitted activities.
- Increasing the number of moorings.
- Safeguarding public access.
- Safeguarding the coastal path.
- Planning and development policy.
- Development management.

Members were then asked to consider a report on proposed amendments to the Building Regulations 1999 written by Nick Stephens.

They agreed with his recommendations on consultation which, it was agreed, must be extensive and in particular include Camp residents to ensure all are aware of requirements which are designed for the public health and safety of persons in and about buildings.

The next meeting is scheduled for July 7 at 8.30am in the Liberation Room of the Secretariat.

British - end of story says Prime Minister

"AS long as the Falkland Islands want to be a sovereign British territory, they should remain sovereign British territory. Full stop, end of story."

Prime Minister David Cameron made the clear statement on Wednesday in response to a question in the House from Andrew Rosindell MP who asked, "Will he remind President Obama when he next sees the US President that negotiations over the Falkland Islands with Argentina will never be acceptable to HM Government?"

The Prime Minister replied, "My Honourable friend makes an excellent point and I'm sure everyone right across the House will want to remember the anniversary of the successful re-taking of the Falklands Islands, and the superb bravery, skill and courage of all our armed forces who took part in that action. We should also remember those that fell in terms of taking back the Falklands."

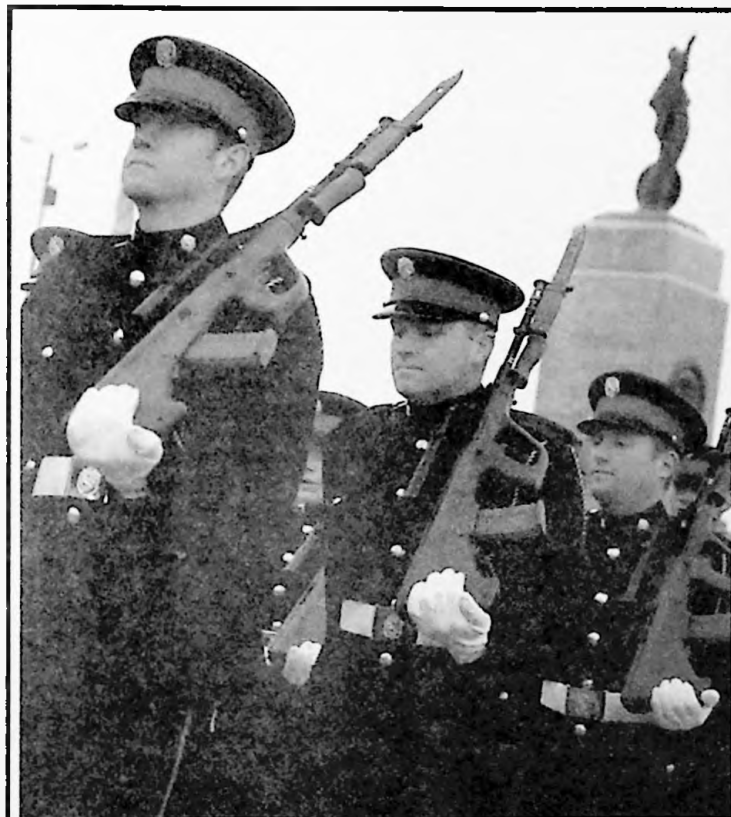
"The point that he makes is a good one. All I would say is this: as long as the Falkland Islands want to be a sovereign British territory, they should remain sovereign British territory. Full stop, end of story."

Mr Rosindell referred in his question to the United States signing of a draft declaration supporting talks over the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands.

MLA Sharon Halford was not surprised by the Prime Minister's words, saying they were "consistent with what he's been saying the whole time."

Members of Parliament showed further support for the Islands with a strong presence at the Falkland Islands Government Annual Reception in London.

Falkland Islands Government Representative in London Sukey Cameron told Penguin News four Members of Parliament including the Deputy Speaker of the House Lyndsay Hoyle attended the reception along with Foreign Office

ministers, representatives of the Ministry of Defence, veterans of the 1982 Conflict and Falkland Islanders. In her annual speech she emphasised the Falklands were entering a vital period in their economic development, and called on the UK Government to continue to work in partnership with the Islands' people in order to create an even more stable economic base from which to grow.

She added, "Members of the Argentine Government continue to seek international support for their claim to our country, and do what they can to disrupt our economy, but we are dynamic, resilient and resourceful people and will pursue economic devel-

opment, and determine our future, regardless of the difficulties that may be put in our way."

"Whilst we refuse to be derailed or distracted by others' agendas, it's time for us to be more proactive in respect of our external relationships. We are exploring new ways to deliver our key messages of self-determination and self-sufficiency."

"We also intend to build upon our economic successes so that we can maintain economic independence and sustain our quality of life."

Loyal Greetings to Her Majesty the Queen were read before a performance of Beating the Retreat by a military band on the lawn.

Weston to launch 30th anniversary

1982 veteran Simon Weston is to launch the 30th anniversary of the Falklands War on June 24 at the Falklands Memorial in Alexandra Gardens, Cardiff.

During 2012, the South Atlantic Medal Association 1982 (SAMA82) will be organising many fund raising events and return visits to the Falkland Islands for veterans. SAMA82 has also commissioned a Falklands Memorial at the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire which will be dedicated on May 20, 2012 to commemorate the 30th Anniversary of the Task Force Landings at San Carlos.

A memorial fund has been started by SAMA82 to raise the £62,000 required to construct and maintain the memorial.

MBE for Andy

LONG term member of the Falkland Islands Defence Force Captain Andy Brownlee is to be honoured with a Member of the British Empire (MBE) medal this month for "services to the community."

Mr Brownlee says he is "delighted, stunned and quite humbled," by the news.

Mr Brownlee has also been a long term member of the Fire Brigade, sat on many committees and trusteeships, is a Justice of the Peace and has undertaken a great deal of charity work, in particular for the Cancer Support and Awareness Trust.

He said, "The Falklands has given me a massive amount since my arrival in 1981 and anything I have given back I have given with a glad heart."

British crimes?

Falkland Islands

THERE was an English tourist, an American tourist and an Australian tourist; and all were the subject of a heated discussion in my parents' kitchen. My brother claimed an antipodean was almost certainly the best to bump into in a bar on holiday, however, his initially mild condemnation of British pomposity (the Americans were just 'loud') became, after a few more beers, rather too vehement for my patriotic father so close to Liberation Day, and before long the discussion rapidly deteriorated from chatty to, well, downright shouty.

Notably at this point my own input had been little more constructive than a few lazy sauvignon-fuelled insults from the sidelines - a crime, come to think of it. I have occasionally been accused of in relation to this column. Suddenly (and with a stroke of genius, I feel) my mother stopped the argument in its tracks by claiming the last time she remembered all of her family engaged in such a furious discussion it had been cut short by a knock at the door by a member of the Special Boat Service at 10pm on a cold June evening in 1982. The initial success of my mother's clever ploy was, of course rather reduced, when it set us off arguing whether it had in fact been 10pm or rather earlier in the evening when the knock had come.

But still we were eventually quietened in only the way that Islanders can be by the thought of those men who quite literally landed on our doorstep, fought and died to allow us what Sukey Cameron described in her speech as "self determination and self sufficiency." Or more often in my family's case, the liberty to take full and very rude advantage of our right to freedom of speech.

And on the subject of freedoms, James Peck has every right to take up Argentine citizenship if he so wishes - but his unfortunate decision to allow himself to be part of Cristina's circus on that particular day was shockingly disrespectful to those British veterans he has purported to respect.

Less shocking, but a tad irritating was MLA Halford's rather random claim that the move by Cristina Kirchner to present Peck with his Argentine ID card and birth certificate was "rather marvellous" that she (Kirchner) recognised our Britishness by "changing" his nationality. That is not the case: Kirchner was not "changing" James' nationality; she was virtually throwing the birth certificate at him on the premise that he is, in her eyes, already Argentine, being born in, as she sees it, a province of Argentina, hence entitled to the certificate.

Sharon and the gang can talk all the guff they want about Argentina scoring 'own goals', but it doesn't change a damn thing. Strong decisions and informative reassuring statements are required by our MLAs, not airy fairy analysis - that's my job, right?

Europeans hungry for Falklands fish

FALKLANDS fish is a "highly traded commodity" and customers are excited about secure and direct access to it, stated Director Fortuna Fishing Company Ltd Stuart Wallace this week.

The Islands' fish is now available from coldstores in Holland and this enables customers to take advantage of favourable trucking rates between markets in Eastern Europe and the main seaport in Europe.

Mr Wallace explained that Fortuna Seafoods BV, the newly established Dutch sales subsidiary of the Falkland's fishing company, made quite an impact at this year's European Seafood Exposition held in Brussels last month.

The event complemented a three month long prospecting trip earlier in the year across Eastern Europe to revive interest in the market for sea-frozen wild-caught whitefish.

Mr Wallace said a smaller, more defined selection of fish allows the company to take a more focused approach to sales, "and target the main end-user markets for niche species of fish that are attracting more attention in the seafood world."

"One such fish is Patagonian Rock Cod. The product of an important fishery in the Falkland Islands, Rock Cod or Notothenia has in the past struggled with a poor image but recently the qualities of the fish, its pure white flesh and firm texture have started to be recognised."

New enquiries were received at the show from general visitors attracted to the stand by the prominent display of frozen fish that had been flown in especially for the event. Many attendees commented on the graphics used for

the stand which centred on a seascape of Surf Bay taken by local photographer Julie Bellhouse.

Mr Wallace said the development of a marketing department marks a step change for Fortuna and its entry into the sector came at the right time. Large European supermarket chains continue to expand in Eastern Europe and are starting to decentralise their purchasing departments giving local departments, responsibilities for sourcing products.

"Newly recruited supermarket managers welcomed the chance to be able to start collaborating directly with a foreign producer so soon and were impressed by the sales efforts of a small fishing company operating from such a remote location."

Mr Wallace said industry people are beginning to appreciate the real implications for sustainable fisheries and in-touch marketing.

Many restaurant buyers came to the show to find out more about the sustainability credentials of Falklands fish, he explained.

This month Fortuna Seafoods BV attended Polfish 2011, the largest trade exhibition in Central Europe.

Record catches

WHILE Illex stocks disappeared relatively early this year, catches of other species have been at a record high.

Sasha Arkhipkin of the Falkland Islands Government Fisheries Department reports that Illex jiggers left by the beginning of May but the remaining 20-25 trawlers of the finfish fleet concentrated their effort on fishing for abundant other species.

He said, "It is likely that the large abundance of small fish - Rock Cod - attracted its predators to migrate to our waters to prey upon it."

"As a result, catches of Hoki, Hake, Kingclip, Red Cod and Skate exceeded expectations,

being close to the record catches observed in May in the last 10-15 years."

Despite excellent results in finfish and Skate fisheries, many trawlers left the Falkland zones for maintenance and crew changes elsewhere, with only six trawlers remaining in the fishing grounds by the middle of June.

Mr Arkhipkin said, "An exploratory survey organised by the Fisheries Department on-board Spanish trawler Manuel Angel Nores revealed dense aggregations of deepwater grenadiers to the east and south of the Falkland Islands, giving good perspectives to start exploitation of this new valuable commercial resource."

ON the eve of Liberation Day a group of Cubs and their leaders made their annual pilgrimage to Mount Tumbledown to remember the eight Scots Guards who were killed in the battle 29 years ago.

Leaders Jan and Tim Miller, parents Chris McLean and Robin Cooper and Grandad Les Harris accompanied the Cubs who laid a cross at the memorial that overlooks Stanley.

The Cubs stood in silence around the Cross while Chris McLean played the Craggs of Tumbledown Mountain on the

bagpipes.

James Tyrrell laid the Cubs cross, followed by Jessica Cooper, Max Rowlands, Michael Goodwin and Ciaran Nye.

The Welsh Guards and others who lost their lives at Bluff Cove during the 1982 War, have also been remembered at Fitzroy where a service was conducted in four parts by Rev Richard Hines on a calm misty day. The large gathering started at the Welsh Guards Memorial, on to the RFA, followed by RAMC and finished at the Memorial to 5 Brigade in the settlement where the last post was played by Paul Freer.

Refreshments were served in the Social Club after the service for all who attended.

West meeting

MANAGEMENT of protected areas was the key message of a Biodiversity Strategy presentation by Falklands Conservation to residents at Fox Bay on June 9. Conservation Officer Craig Dockrill, and Nick Rendell of the Environmental Department made the journey to the West to answer questions on the subject as well as discuss the recent Biodiversity Workshop. Chair of the meeting Nuala McKay said around fifteen people attended despite foul weather. She said Mr Dockrill appeared to address peoples' concerns about the direction of the strategy.

More offences

THE Police have made more arrests so far this year than last, with the number of offences increasing by 50 per cent. The greatest increase in offences was recorded in January, when eight of the offences related to juveniles and included three public order offences. Chief Police Officer Barry Marsden told the Police Committee on Wednesday, that of particular concern was that the public order offences were racially aggravated.

KTV's war films

PROVIDING an historic reminder of what Liberation Day is all about, local television provider KTV have been showing a collection of Falkland Islands films on The History Channel. KTV's founder Mario Zuvic said it would stay on until Sunday night and reminded viewers that Myriam's Country channel was also carrying music from the 1970s until June 1982 as well as recordings of Patrick Watts' broadcasts during and after the Argentine invasion.

Officers needed

THE Police Force is looking to recruit two new officers in the near future and it is hoped the post will be filled by local applicants. CS Marsden said following liaison with the Human Resources Department, three UK constables had extended their contracts for a further 12 months while another was due to leave within the year.

Police feedback

THE public is to have an opportunity to consult with members of the Police Committee on what they expect from their local force. Councillor Gavin Short has been tasked with arranging a meeting.

Take an icy dip

THE Midwinter swim takes place on Saturday at Surf Bay. Registration starts at 10.30am and the stampede will begin with a big bang provided by the Falkland Islands Defence Force at midday.

Liberation betrayal by war hero's son

A MAN who claimed he was no different from his Falklands war-hero father, and would fight Argentina if "a war was to happen tomorrow," has accepted an Argentine ID and birth certificate card from the country's President on the very anniversary of the liberation of the Falkland Islands from Argentine occupation.

James Peck (42) has been labelled "a disgrace," by members of his Islands family for his very public U-turn.

James' estranged wife Maria is Argentine and they have two small sons, all of whom now live in Argentina.

His Uncle Pat Peck said, "No-one in the Islands will be impressed with what he has done and I don't wish to see him back here. He's let everyone down and the family in particular. He's a disgrace to the family."

Pat added, "Government has invested a lot in him over the years in education and training."

In December of 2007 James Peck stood for Legislative Council claiming, "I am no different from my father, in my sense of being a Falkland Islander. I know the Argentine claim will never disappear; I also know that if a war was to happen tomorrow I would do the same as him [Terry Peck] without a second thought."

On June 14, Liberation Day, Argentine President Cristina Fern-

andez Kirchner presented Peck with his Argentine documents at a high profile media event.

On Thursday Mr Peck defended his decision saying it was primarily taken to be able to live with his two youngest children who are Argentine, and to be able to "move on from the past."

He said he was aware of the symbolic nature of the images published, but had attended the proceedings with a close friend in Argentina, a former Argentine conscript who had "suffered greatly" during the war and that his father's reputation of fighting against the dictatorship had been "honoured in public during the

proceedings by the President."

Mr Peck said he had no doubt about the "sincerity" of the President's words.

"And, 29 years after the war in the Islands there is no military in Argentina, as before. If there were, I would not be here," said Mr Peck.

Mr Peck's words however are unlikely to appease the sense of betrayal his action on such an emotive day has created in the Falklands.

Additionally, Islanders are suffering the economic effects of Argentine sanctions on the shipping route between South America and the Falklands and are angered at what is viewed by many as a contemptuous act on the most important anniversary in the Islands' calendar.

Mr Peck, however, said he thought it hypocritical, for people to make judgments. He added, "perhaps they should be asking why has Britain itself in the last ten years caused so much ill feeling around the world with its own 'foreign policy', which has

had a knock on effect in South America especially. Yet I, as an individual wishing to cross borders, receive the label of traitor or worse."

He concluded: "As for what was my home, it shall always be as such, and I wish no one ill there with my decision."

"We all should be free to come and go as we please, crossing borders without shame, hate, or bigotry. This is what I will pass on to my children."

Bulk of housing list made up of 18 to 25 year olds

TWO-thirds of the forty people on the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) Housing List are between the age of 18 and 25.

The age group, described at the recent FIG Housing Meeting as being "prime candidates for accommodation at the YMCA or Lookout Lodge," are out of luck, however, as spaces are few.

Penguin News called the managers of both organisations and a total of two rooms (plus two emergency rooms) were available at the YMCA, while Lookout Lodge was "consistently" booked out.

The news is not all bad, however, according to Housing Officer Anton Livermore who pointed out that the length of the list is, "the best it has been in the last 20 years."

He told Penguin News there is currently no policy with regard to housing that particular age group, but he is working on a paper examining the further needs of housing and, "among those addressed will be that group."

With the completion of serviced plots at Mink Park in West Stanley, eight government properties will be made available to persons on the list, but Mr Livermore confirmed the housing wasn't necessarily suitable

for young single people: "It is mainly houses and two bedroom flats."

In the longer term future 12 plots will be released in the Leading Lights area in East Stanley and again this will mean more government housing released into the pool.

As a result Mr Livermore "is reasonably positive" about the future, "we do feel for those people on the list but at present there isn't a great deal we can do."

He added, "If there were another place for 18 to 25 year olds that would be ideal, but this is unlikely in the near future - it all comes down to funding."

Single mother Pollyanna Lennie (24) is less than cheerful. Mother

to a four month old baby, she is currently living with her parents, brother, three dogs, two cats and two hamsters: she describes her situation as "overcrowded."

Ms Lennie has been on the list since June 2010. She was offered a bed-sit flat last December while she was heavily pregnant, but "freaked out" when she realised she couldn't afford to pay to carpet the house, and the flat only had a shower - unsuitable for bathing a baby.

She was told she would be offered a larger place after six months, thus in order to save money before she became a single mother, Ms Lennie decided it would make more sense to stay at her parents until it became available.

In the meantime the offer of a larger house was made to another mother already in government housing, and from having been told she was top of the list, Ms Lennie has heard nothing since March.

"I get told by people I need to complain to get a house. I don't want to make government angry by complaining about it; social welfare in particular has been so helpful to me, but I really need my own space for me and my daughter."

Invest in tourism?

FACILITIES for tourists, and the need for a commercial north/south air-link, were both issues raised by candidates for by-election at a meeting held by the group this week.

Meeting attendee Phil Middleton raised the topic of tourism development priorities, a subject picked up initially by Steve Vincent who commented that tourism was "underplayed," and had "vast potential" but the Falklands "must offer something in return."

Mr Vincent mooted a mid week flight and an improved transport system possibly on Ross Road which should also be linked to the port.

Mike Summers reminded attendees of the meeting that a new strategy was about to be produced and this had been largely "put together by the tourism industry itself."

He agreed a new air-link was vital adding, "but we know nothing about what discussions are taking place. I know there are issues of secrecy but let's face it they [Argentina] can find out anything if they really want to anyway."

Mr Summers saw most money in passenger exchanges and emphasised that a north/south air-link was extremely important for the development of the tourism industry.

Norman Clark commented, "It is rather nice that MLAs are admitting that tourism is a growth industry."

He also suggested a loyalty tax for those ships that repeatedly call into the Falkland Islands.

Mr Clark said that any port project must also look at acceptance of cruise vessels, making it easier for them to visit the Falklands and land their passengers.

John Birmingham disagreed that a port was vital to cruise tourism saying ships that travelled to the Falkland Islands preferred to use tenders as it was "part of the trip."

He noted the fickleness of the cruise industry suggesting reasoning for a new port should not be based on it: "The cruise industry will come one day, and then not the next year."

Mr Birmingham raised the issue of available facilities for visitors. He said that currently there was a lodge "up for sale" that no one appeared to want, and a guest house in Stanley had been closed for nearly a year and nobody seemed inclined to purchase that either.

He asked the question, should the Falkland Islands invest in "super facilities" and hope for the tourists to come and use them or wait until visitor levels increase before investing.

Tourist expenditure record rise

TOURIST expenditure in the Falkland Islands has enjoyed a record rise - up 53% - according to new data released by the Falkland Islands Tourist Board.

This season, the destination benefited from an average spend of £107 per arrival, compared to £70 in the previous season. This increase is based on the combined average spend of both cruise and air passengers. Total direct tourism expenditure for the season was £5 million.

Results were generated from departure surveys conducted at MPA, plus departing cruise passengers.

The Falklands Islands Tourist Board has carried out surveys for four years, and the latest results represented the largest increase on record.

Paul Trowell, General Manager Falkland Island Tourist Board said: "We are extremely encouraged by the results, particularly in the current economic climate. With our cruise and air arrivals for 2010/2011 already ahead of forecast, we are confident that tourism will continue to be the second largest contributor to the GDP in the Falkland Islands."

"This latest data is also very

timely after viewing the text in the Governor's address which stated "income from the country's two biggest drivers of the economy - fisheries and tourism - left a little to be desired, not such the case for tourism," added Paul.

"The last Satellite Account, set up in 2009, revealed that tourism accounted for 4.2% of the Island's economy. Gathering accurate statistics is acting as a vital tool for the Tourist Board and with this in mind we are setting up a new satellite account to collate more up to date statistics. We are looking forward to receiving the revised figures to measure the true eco-

nomie impact of tourism."

"While we are starting to see worldwide economic recovery we must not be complacent and forget the impact that fluctuating oil prices, fuel surcharges, natural disasters and other factors can have on tourist spending," added Paul.

The new National Tourism Strategy is now a strong driver to increase tourism contribution to the Falkland Islands and keep growing spend per head. Initiatives such as developing new air links and new markets to the Falkland Islands are key factors to drive this future growth.

Legislative Assembly By-Election: Manifestos

I WOULD like to offer myself as a candidate for this by-election. I care about the Falklands and the future of its people. I was born here, educated here and have spent all of my life living and working in these islands. I have seen the good times and bad times we have experienced but have no desire to live anywhere else in the world.

I intend to keep this very brief, working on the adage that a lot of talk before an election is usually far less productive than action after.

Let us address some of the immediate issues that face our current Assembly.

The steep increase in fuel prices and the climb of inflation will have a big knock on effect to all. Both private and public sector businesses and workers will be hurt by this. The lower paid will suffer the most, and although we do have a minimum wage to be implemented soon, I believe it is important that it is reviewed regularly and rising costs taken into account when doing so. In the public sector I believe there is merit in the suggestion that when there is an increase in salaries that those earning lower salaries receive a bigger percentage pay rise than the higher ones. Our economy is stable to a degree, but caution has to be exercised in our future budgets.

The rising cost of recruitment for certain posts is definitely a subject for concern. I totally support as many positions as realistically possible being filled by local people.

Unfortunately many job descriptions are now so laden with qualification obligations that many locally trained people are

automatically ruled out of applying.

I think the question has to be asked whether or not some job descriptions are over the top.

Training is a key issue to filling positions locally and should be concentrated on.

It is important, if not vital that we obtain a shipping link with and through South America. All of our industries

will be massively affected if this does not happen.

It is obvious that a large ship arriving and leaving the Falklands every six weeks or so only half full of cargo is not sustainable. However, surely it must be worth thinking about chartering a smaller vessel to suit our needs.

If something the size of the St Branden came and went perhaps on a less regular basis, but at least full of cargo, then subsidy could be kept to a minimum. What we must do is to talk to and listen to our existing local shipping companies, and ask for ideas from the private sector.

Argentina's attempts to stifle our economic growth continue. They refuse to co-operate in scientific research for fishing stock preservation, they harass investment in tourism and oil, and of course they make every attempt to block our transport links.

While they continue to do so we should use every possible outlet available to us to get our message across to the international forum.

These are just a few of the issues that I have concerns about. I am sure there are many other issues and thoughts that I haven't touched on. I believe it is just as important, if not more so, for me to get your views.

I am available at any time to discuss with anyone who wishes to either question me or present their opinions on any issue they feel should be addressed.

If elected I can only offer you common sense, honesty and the will and commitment to listen to and work with you, the electorate.

MOST of the people who have talked with me about standing in this by-election would like to see me representing the Falklands overseas again. The Argentine Government is as aggressive as it has been for many years; we risk losing ground in both political and economic spheres, and there is a need to respond strongly and confidently to their outdated political concepts and down-right lies. As well as maintaining support in Parliament, we need to talk directly to EU institutions, other European countries and key states, to put our case firmly and strongly. I am experienced and confident in this role, and would be able to bring additional weight to the Government programme.

I have long advocated a strong North-South commercial airlink, free of Argentine interference. The opportunity for this may be near, and substantial effort and knowhow must be applied to finding the right solution for the current time. In a similar vein economic and social development will be strongly assisted by a continuance of a commercial containerised shipping service. It is time to be talking to the public about the realistic options available to us in these areas, and gaining their support for what will be very substantial risk investments.

Our economy remains strong, but subject to strong inflationary pressures and only moderate growth. Setting surplus budgets to maintain the real value of our reserves as a hedge against inflation is a key priority. This will require stronger economic growth, and there are some exciting new opportunities for businesses to take on new challenges, with privatisation of FIG and MoD services and servicing the new oil and gas exploration opportunities.

However, the introduction of new payroll taxes and additional personal taxes is a disincentive to small businesses and employers, and I will advocate economic policies which encourage growth. The lower paid in the private

sector have been particularly hard hit by increasing Government charges and increasing food and fuel prices; tax thresholds need to be raised to alleviate this, achievable without contributing to the inflationary cycle.

The essential public services of health and education require a large proportion of our national budget.

I strongly support the delivery of high quality primary health care free of charge to all residents, though increasing costs mean that priorities have to be set and maintained. Continued high levels of investment in primary and preventative medicine are necessary to maintain a healthy society. Equally I am a strong supporter of education policies which provide opportunity to young people to do the best they can, and provide training opportunities to adults to achieve their full potential. But again not everything is affordable, and priorities have to be orientated towards those subjects and courses that have relevance for the Falklands, and can help Falkland Islanders fill key jobs in their own community, instead of recruiting from overseas. We should have confidence in our own ability to run our own country to the maximum extent possible. This starts from the top, and elected Members must not only create the strategies and policies which form the mandate for the Government, but also explain them fully and clearly to the electorate, and take responsibility for them. Clear leadership by the elected Government needs to be reasserted.

I will continue to be a prime mover in openness and transparency of Government, and perhaps the key lesson I have learned from the General Election is that we failed to communicate adequately with the general public. I don't believe this aspect of Government has improved since then, and more effort needs to go into providing information on Government policies and programmes.

The economy really needs to grow. If elected, I would support any initiative that attracts new investment into the islands. I believe the Government has to do more to encourage companies to invest in the Falklands. One area that needs to be taken more seriously is import substitu-

tion. I believe there are real opportunities but there must be a dialogue with those enterprises who currently supply fresh produce.

One serious concern is the apparent lack of any progress in an independent shipping service. This is of national importance. My view is that a co-operative approach involving all importers and exporters is the way forward.

Although no longer having children in the school system I am still interested in education. I don't believe the combining of Community School Head with the Assistant Director's post effectively making a part time Headteacher is an improvement. I have yet to meet anyone in the profession who thinks it can work. There is still time for a rethink.

I am a fair minded person and it's unacceptable to me that within the Education Department it seems that some people can take time out but not others. If elected I would take this up with those who make these decisions. Within FIG there is an inflexibility regarding legitimate time out. This needs to be followed up. Low moral equals low productivity.

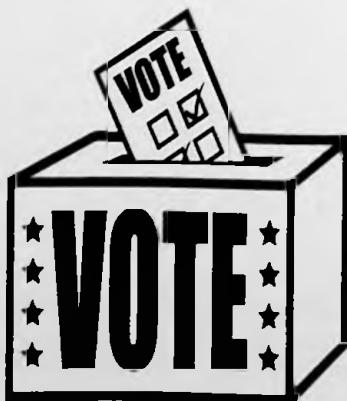

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

ON Thursday of last week the groups that have been working on import replacement, transport links and public diplomacy reported back again. Some opportunities for new import replacement projects and/or the expansion of existing ones should be advertised shortly. Much work has been done by all groups but only the most politically naive would expect any detailed reporting of decisions and work being undertaken by the latter groups.

WHILST understanding the need for candidates in the forthcoming by-election to have a platform for their bids for selection, I would advise caution on glib statements on foreign affairs. As I said at a public meeting some months ago, I do not recall a time when Members have been so actively consulted and our wishes so well supported by representatives of the UK Foreign Office. Again only the most inexperienced would expect a blow by blow account of what is being done.

AT my regular meeting on education I was delighted to learn that we are at last making real progress on the establishment of agricultural apprenticeships, something many members, past and present, view as important. Apprenticeships generally should never be undervalued, or seen as an easy option. Properly structured apprenticeships, coordinated to meet the needs of both employer and apprentice are a great start to a career.

THE most frequent complaint I have received about the recent budget was that the majority chose, on this occasion, not to increase the duty on alcohol. I'd like to assure people that this does not condone or excuse alcohol abuse, drunkenness or any crimes in which alcohol is a factor. Nor do we underestimate the cost to budgets of illness related to alcohol abuse. A little amateur research indicated that alcohol is not particularly cheap here, but I'd like to hear from more people on the subject before the next budget.

IT is hard to believe this week marks 29 years since the Liberation of our country. Our wish to commemorate the occasion is undiminished, as is our gratitude to our liberators and to those who continue to protect the freedom we enjoy.

By-Election: Manifesto

My definition of a good councillor: is to support the aspirations of electorate and resolve their fears and concerns.

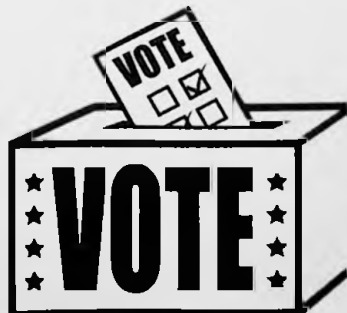

International Tours & Travel agent Corrinne Paice travelled to Peru last month in order to gain a personalised insight into the main tourist destinations and hotels offered by the company.

MY trip started with a two day travel show (Peru Travelmart) in the capital city of Peru, Lima. Here I had the opportunity to meet with new and existing suppliers including hotels and service providers. It was really helpful to be able to put faces to the names of our main operator in Peru that has been in business for more than 30 years.

It was both interesting and useful to find out what new products and programmes are being offered to complement our existing programmes. I was fortunate to be able to share my experience with a travelling partner from San Francisco who was also taking part in the familiarisation visit provided by our Peruvian tour operator.

After just over an hour's flight across the beautiful Andean mountain range I landed in the city of Cuzco, located 3,400m/11,200 ft above sea level. The same afternoon I had a city tour of Cuzco taking in the Plaza de Armas (main square), the Cathedral, Santo Domingo Church (Koricancha) and the surrounding ruins of Puka Pukara, Kenko, Tampu Machay and the renowned fortress and religious site

of Sacasayhuaman, famous for its cosmic energy. We also had the opportunity to purchase and see the production of local silver and baby alpaca products.

The following day we took an excursion to the village of Pisac, located 20 miles (32km) from Cuzco in the Urubamba Valley. Here you have time to visit the colourful Indian market. Later we had lunch at Wayra Ranch sampling locally grown produce including beef heart, giant corn, fish and potatoes, all cooked in a typical Peruvian style. Afterwards there was an exhibition of Peruvian Paso horses and the 'Marienera' dance. This option is only available though to those taking a private tour but is well worth the experience.

Following lunch there was a tour of the town and fortress of Ollantaytambo located in the Sacred Valley of the Incas. The views from the top of the temple down into the valley are breathtaking. Once more, it is surprising to see the enormous size of the rocks used in the construction of this complex that came from quarries located at the other side of the valley and on the opposite side of the river, several kilometres away. How did they transport and carry them to the top of the hill?

The hotels in the Sacred Valley all have a beautiful and picturesque setting so one or two nights would

be recommended to have time to appreciate the hotels and the services that they offer.

The next morning I woke early with great excitement, the highlight of any trip to Peru awaited me; to see Machu Picchu. We travelled in the Vistadome class with Peru-Rail from Ollantaytambo to Machu Picchu, a scenic and relaxing one hour 30 minute ride through the valley following the Urubamba River. To enhance your travel experience, the train carriage has windows in

ancient citadel of Machu Picchu. Lost City of the Incas.

Machu Picchu was rediscovered in July 1911 by Hiram Bingham who through a chance encounter with a local farmer, brought the news of this fabulous place to the Western world. Though the terraces, filled with fertile soil from the river valley far below, were still being cultivated, the city was overgrown by jungle, mysteriously abandoned by the Incas 500 years before.

Most travellers access the site in

the roof allowing you to see the glaciers, river, mountains and the changing vegetation as you move into the cloud forest that surrounds Machu Picchu. A light breakfast that is included in your train ticket price is also served.

On arrival at Machu Picchu train station we headed off to catch the Zig Zag bus that takes you from the town of Aguas Calientes (also known as Machu Picchu Town) at the base of the mountain to the top and the entrance to the site. After about 15 minutes of climbing numerous steps we were treated to our first and certainly not the last, awe-inspiring, spine-tingling view of the

same way I did, via train and bus but every morning, several hundred people arrive at the Sun Gate after spending three or four days walking the Inca Trail. As well as being able to experience Machu Picchu before the main throng of visitors arrive at around 11am, the Inca Trail also gives the opportunity to enjoy the riches along the way: darting hummingbirds, delicate orchids, soaring condors and astonishing works of masonry.

The spiritual feeling one has whilst looking out over this incredible lost city is indescribable. Machu Picchu really does earn its status of being one of the Wonders of the World.

The three hour guided tour of the ruins was informative and enjoyable and was invaluable to really appreciate the history of this majestic complex. A buffet lunch is included at the Machu Picchu Sanctuary Lodge and afterwards there's free time to go back into the site to explore independently.

For those visitors wishing to re-visit the site the following day, you must pay again for your entry ticket and bus but a second visit is highly recommended in order to have the chance to complete one of the optional treks to either the Sun Gate or Wayna Picchu.

The town of Aguas Calientes is small but amiable and a wander around its cobbled streets is most enjoyable.

The following day after a relaxing Andean stone massage at the Inkaterro Spa, we took the Vistadome train back to Cuzco, a journey of about four hours through the valley and following the river. The excitement of the previous day was gone but the memories and emotions of our visit to Machu Picchu were still very fresh in our minds.

The bus journey from Cuzco to Puno, located on the shores of Lake Titicaca takes about 10 hours on a comfortable tourist bus complete with hostesses and English speaking guide.

As well as having lunch included, we had the opportunity to visit An-

dahuayllillas with its main church known as the Peruvian Sistine Chapel, Raqchi - temple to the god Viracocha and the museum at Pucara. The highest point of the journey reaches 4,338 metres above sea level.

Lake Titicaca is the highest navigable lake in the world and straddles both Peru and Bolivia.

After a night in the city of Puno, we took a tour by boat on Lake Titicaca to the Quechua speaking island of Taquile, located 24 miles (38 km) from Puno where you can view an ancient communal way of life and purchase world famous hand weavings.

Along the way we visited the floating islands of the Uros Indians, ancient inhabitants of Lake Titicaca. The islands themselves as well as the houses and boats are made from 'totora', the reed that grows in the lake. You are invited to view their houses and explore the island.

From Puno it's also possible to cross over the border to Bolivia either by catamaran or bus.

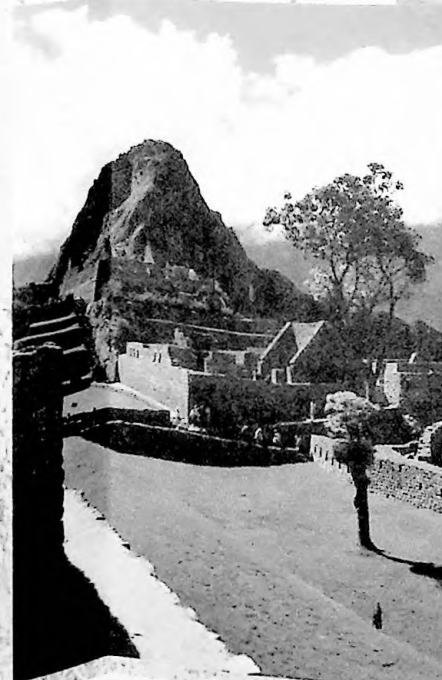
I flew from Juliaca, located approximately one hour from Puno to Lima but there are also connections to other cities in Peru.

Department of Agriculture Wool Market Report 9th June, 2011

By Tony Mills, Department of Agriculture, Falkland Islands

A low seasonal offering was met by a solid increase in the EMT which breached the 1400 AU c/kg barrier to close at 1416 AU c/kg (919 GB p/kg). It appears that buyers see no major changes in the supply side of the equation and are covering their requirements. Things may change in late August/September with supply increases expected. The mid micron categories were again the main beneficiaries of the stronger market push with the finer end of the clip suffering from quality issues. Merino skirtings are a mixed bag with high VM and cotted lines suffering. Analysts note that these lines are showing above average pass in rates. The banter on the local scene has revolved around the review of the past season and the long overdue lift in prices. The final lines of the clip are hitting the market and some offers are already being considered for next years clip. It appears that the prices are remaining solid so I am sure some serious negotiations with buyers will ensue. A notable change in the weather will be placing some added pressure on stock condition and feed quality. Ideally this won't transfer through into the lambing season.

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Snapshots from the Rural Development booklet sent to all Camp households designed by Studio 52

Plan of action begins to take shape for rural community

WITH the launch of a new website and the publication of a short booklet the Rural Development Strategy finally seems to have taken form.

When asked to sum up what the RDS is, RDS coordinator Nuala Knight said it was "a plan of action." She was quick to add, "what its not, is an oracle. Camp clearly faces some challenges and it is going to take real endeavour and commitment to create positive change."

While some might think the booklet is all gloss and no substance, Mrs Knight explained the RDS had been unable to persuade even their most dedicated supporters to start reading it, never mind digest it and respond to it. It was clearly a problem, she said. "But, we like a challenge, so we had a rethink, got some professional help with the design, and the end result was the booklet."

The point of the booklet and the website is to put a flag in the ground and say "here's where we are and here's where we want to get to," said Mrs Knight.

The aim, she said is to give the Camp population access to information and create opportunities so that they have a say and help

shape the future of Camp.

"The website and the booklet are tools for us all. They are tools to check that we, in the public sector, are doing what we said we were going to do; they are tools to be used at a local level to understand where and how to get involved, how to influence funding decisions and how to effect change locally whether it is changes to the way roads are maintained, education is delivered or the way in which the Agriculture Department delivers its services."

Mrs Knight said she wanted to make the delivery of the RDS open and transparent so that decision-making can be understood, scrutinised and challenged.

"This helps people get engaged, helps make us more answerable and more accountable. These are public funds at the end of the day and people have a democratic right to know what we're doing, why we're doing it and if we're being effective."

Camp's greatest asset is its population and Mrs Knight believes there is no one better placed than the people living at the "coal face" to decide if what is being done is making a difference. "However, we need to make sure that our

communities know that their participation will be welcomed and will be worthwhile. We hope the website provides another opportunity for people to participate and get involved in the development of Camp."

A budget of £60,000 has been approved to support the RDS's five key priorities.

These priorities are based

around the key objectives of increasing the value of the Camp economy, increasing the population, improving quality of life and protecting the quality of the environment.

"How we meet those objectives and how we spend those funds are questions we hope the Camp community will help us with," said Mrs Knight.

The club will re-group on Tuesday June 28th and continue to play on Tuesday evenings 7pm-8pm. New members welcome.










Brown Trout off the menu

FALKLANDS trout could disappear once and for all from local restaurant menus following a decision by the Environmental Committee yesterday to make the sale of Brown Trout illegal.

A four week consultation took place in February which received 42 responses.

Environmental Officer Nick Rendell said 69 per cent of the respondents supported placing a ban on the sale of Brown Trout, while 31 per cent felt it should be legal.

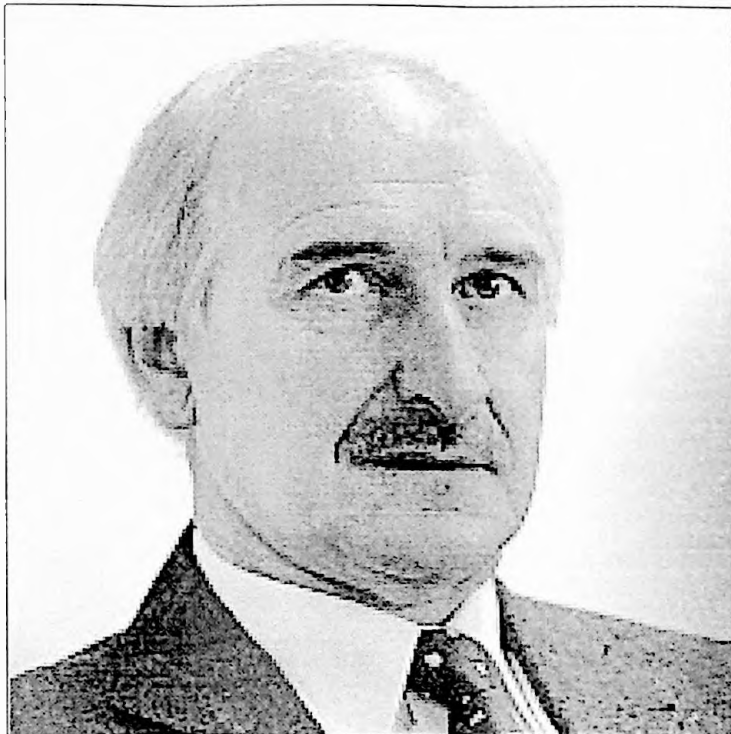
The majority of respondents were anglers as expected, said Mr Rendell and presented a wide range of concerns including; increased fishing effort and chance of poaching; reduced stocks as a result of increased fishing and the potential impact on fishing tourism if stocks were reduced.

A small number of conservationists responded and cited Brown Trout as an invasive species that should be fished to allow the reduction of numbers.

Landowners were against the sale, but food retailers were predictably in favour of the sale being made legal.

The ambiguous wording of the Conservation of Wildlife and Nature Ordinance (1999) had led most people to assume that the sale of Brown Trout was already illegal and the recent decision has now raised the question of whether fish donated to a restaurant could legally be sold on to the customer.

The Attorney General's Chambers was unable to confirm whether this would be the case, but told Penguin News it would depend on how the legislation is formed.



Summers cruises back into office

VOTERS have sent a message to the serving Legislative Assembly by electing the man who was arguably the figure head of the former council.

Mike Summers, who served as a councillor for 13 years before being ousted with his colleagues in the 2009 general election, won by a clear majority in yesterday's Stanley by-election.

Picking up 38.3 per cent of the votes, 83 more than second placed Steve Vincent who took 177 votes, Mr Summers speaking from the Isle of Wight said he was, "very pleased to be reelected. I suspect the vote reflects concerns about the Argentine position and I hope I can bring some experience to add to the team's work in countering Argentine claims."

Steve Vincent said he was disappointed not to be elected, but offered his congratulations to Mr Summers, who he said he was sure would do a good job. Mr Vincent said he was encouraged by the amount of votes

he had received and it had convinced him to stand in the next general election. Mr Summers was, he said, a "very good statesman."

Asked if she was surprised by the result MLA Emma Edwards said: "Yes and no, Mike has a lot of loyal supporters in Stanley. I would like to have seen fresh blood though, simply because it is always good to get new people to experience what council is like."

Former Assembly Member Andrea Clausen said the result was totally what she expected from the word on the street: "Mike has always excelled in international affairs and that is what he based his manifesto on."

John Birmingham said he would like to have done better, but fully respected the electorate's choice. He thanked those who had voted for him.

Norman Clark took third place with 96 votes. John Birmingham 87 and Ian Hansen 49.

Deputy PM's Brazil visit to include South Atlantic issues

ACTING Governor Ric Nye was confident Britain's Deputy Prime Minister would raise the issue of the Falkland Islands during his three day trade visit to Brazil that began on Thursday June 23.

Mr Nye said: "The Deputy Prime Minister will discuss a range of issues on his visit. The UK is keen to broaden and deepen its relationship with Brazil, so there's a good deal to talk about."

"I am confident discussions will include South Atlantic regional issues. Brazil of course has a longstanding official position on the Falklands, but the UK position is also very clear."

Prior to the visit, The Telegraph reported that sources close to Mr Clegg said he was planning to raise the dispute at a meeting with Antonio Patriota, Brazil's Foreign Minister and potentially when Mr Clegg and Mr Browne met Brazilian Vice President Michel Temer.

However, another newspaper report yesterday (Thursday) said Mr Clegg skirted political tensions over the Falklands and concentrated on initiatives for a more pronounced British business presence in the country.

Mr Clegg said tellingly, though, "we should never underestimate the cohesive power of trade. It brings people together, fostering new understandings. Not between governments, or diplomats, but people, businesses, their staff, and their communities too."

"Trade ensures nations have a stake in each other's success, in working together peacefully, constructively and towards the same goals."

Mr Clegg was accompanied by the Culture and Universities Ministers and the Trade and Investment Minister as well as heads of 20 leading firms.

FALKLAND ISLANDS

IT is an odd situation to feel editorially obliged to harangue the newest member of the Legislative Assembly when I have absolutely no idea who he is - print deadlines demand this column be completed early Thursday. But his identity is in fact irrelevant as today's musing is generated by the possibility he might acquire the agricultural portfolio - an odd situation you might judge, he being a Stanley candidate, but perhaps fortunate for our rural community bearing in mind a proportion of their own representatives have been described as either not here, or occasionally rather unkindly, not all there.

Facetiousness apart, the agricultural portfolio is a vital one, not simply because its inhabitants maintain the majority of our land mass, but because the camp is an area with tremendous potential for continued development far beyond the traditional.

Additionally, the portfolio holder will require some strength of mind in order to take on a few influential, but reputedly blinkered individuals, allegedly convinced the Falklands ceases to exist beyond the Stanley boundary.

That is not to condemn any Stanley entrepreneur for having little focus on anything other than his own spreadsheet, after all it is that commendable single mindedness that engenders success and boosts the economy; but it is of concern that one or two give the impression of being so jealous of assistance given to the development of rural businesses that they will use their influence to its detriment.

But perhaps they are not the only ones at fault, because there is a pervasive attitude in a sector of the community that wavers perilously close to suggesting camp residents are somehow less deserving of certain basic rights and services than the rest of us.

There may also be a lack of recognition that far fewer farms are the ailing enterprises that resulted from viciously low wool prices in the 80s but in fact are close to, if not already, flourishing businesses owned by individuals and couples who have invested heavily alongside FIG financial assistance, in order to develop the quality of their stock and land, or alternatively, diversify into a parallel business such as farm stay accommodation or a cruise tourist excursion.

For that lack of recognition some farmers may also be partly to blame, not least for an unhelpful paranoia that if they appear too successful developmental support will dry up. It's an unworthy belief for our government strategists must surely be bright enough to understand that camp businesses help support our community too, and if encouraged to grow and prosper will further enhance our economy, all the while keeping alive that part of the Falklands that is synonymous with our history, our culture and our very identity.

FIC revenue up 20%

FALKLAND Islands Company (FIC) revenue is up 20% to 14.9 million with "buoyant retail sales resulted from recent investment in West Store and oil exploration activity," said chair of Falkland Islands Holdings plc (FIH) David Hudd yesterday (Thursday).

Mr Hudd reported "another successful year for the group," with pre-tax profits increasing to a record £2.73 million compared to £2.69 million in 2010.

The group's trading businesses also include Portsmouth Harbour Ferry

Company, Momart and Falkland Oil and Gas.

FIH said it is confident the group's trading businesses will perform well over the medium term. In the year ended March 31, pre-tax profit was boosted 1.5% and group revenue for the period jumped 9%.

Portsmouth Harbour Ferry Company posted flat revenue for the year of £3.7 million, with slightly reduced passenger numbers leading to a fractional fall in operating profit to £0.79 million, from £0.80 million in 2010.

Islanders welcome delayed Brigadier with GH reception

THE Falkland Islands new Commander British Forces, Brigadier Bill Aldridge, eventually arrived in the Islands on Monday after a four night delay in Ascension Island due to flight disruption caused by the Chilean volcanic ash cloud.

On Tuesday evening the Brigadier was guest of honour at a Government House reception hosted by Acting Governor Ric Nye. The Brigadier, whose wife Jill will join him shortly, said, "we looked to the opportunities and challenges here and decided this was something that was very unlikely to come our way ever again and was therefore something we wanted to embrace wholeheartedly. And we are really looking forward to getting to know the Islands."

He added, "I have been around long enough to know there's no point in coming in with great and good ideas when you don't understand the community or the situation, and setting everything off on a different track because invariably it is the wrong track. So I am not here to change things. I am here to help things move along in the positive direction they are going; and ultimately to provide that deterrent function that the military are here to deliver."

The Brigadier has served on many deployments in his 28 years

in the British Army. He was commissioned into the Royal Regiment of Fusiliers as a Platoon Commander in 1983 and served in Northern Ireland, Cyprus the Balkans and Afghanistan. Since 2001 he has been involved in the planning for UK deployments to Afghanistan and Macedonia as well as NATO's Reserve Force for the 2005 Afghan elections.

Most recently Brigadier Aldridge took command of 42(North West) Bde in 2008, and oversaw the construction and subsequent removal of the Barker Crossing in Workington, following the destruction of the original bridge as the result of 2009 flooding. Photo Cpl Grant BFSAL.

Pot holes, rutting and sloppy material

A NORMAL topic of conversation as the winter draws on is the state of the Stanley to Mount Pleasant road, and in the last week it has drawn a fair amount of criticism from frustrated and muddled users.

Drivers have bemoaned the wear and tear on their vehicles and questioned why haulage vehicles, particularly government trucks continue to cart quarry materials when the road is at its most vulnerable.

Highways Technical Engineer Simon Catton said his department did not have the power to regulate truck movements and would only advise haulers when asked, including other government departments.

He appealed however, for drivers when the road was wet not to

undertake any HGV movements unless they were absolutely necessary, adding that this applied to the whole road network not just the MPA road and Stanley.

He explained: "The MPA road has deteriorated as it does every winter and our ability to maintain it in a satisfactory condition is severely hampered. The main issues are pot holes, rutting and sloppy material, which increases the risk of skidding. Unfortunately there is no one area we would count as being particularly good but we do try to keep the section from Sapper Hill to Ponies Pass Quarry safe so that people can continue with their building projects. The worst section of road is between Fitzroy ridge and MPA with a

myriad of problems and I would suggest people take extra care when driving along this section."

Efforts were made on Wednesday to grade and roll the MPA road, following several dry days. However, although the surface was dry it was still very wet only a couple of inches down and the task had to be abandoned and spot capping continued.

Most of the FIG HGV movements seen on the MPA road are the Highways department hauling capping materials to fix roads.

"As we can spot cap in the wet we have deemed it better to continue hauling in the wet rather than let the roads deteriorate much further, although we do stop when it is raining too hard," said Mr Catton.

Common fees a raw deal say Stanley horse owners

HORSE owners feel they are getting a raw deal being charged for the use of Stanley Common for grazing when other outdoor activities have been granted rent free leases for parts of the Common.

Horse owners pay an annual total of £15,000 to keep horses in and around Stanley, yet the Golf Club, motorbike riders and model aircraft enthusiasts have access to land free of charge to carry out their hobbies.

More than £6,000 each year is paid in Common grazing fees while the balance is made up from grazing licences for government land.

All revenue goes into the FIG Consolidated Fund with only £1,000 allocated annually to the Department of Agriculture (DoA) for fencing.

"I think we are being penalised for keeping our horses which are a very important part of our heritage," said Angeline Joshua who rides regularly and takes part in some events at Stanley and Camp sports.

A maximum of 50 horses (calculated from the dry sheep equivalent per acre) graze in the Cape Pembroke area from June 1 to September 30 each year and owners pay £89 for each animal, a rate which is set by the Lands Committee, but administered by DoA.

The DoA is now also responsible for the allocation of grazing plots, although any new plots to be allocated would still go before

the Lands Committee.

But with a minimum rate of £35 per acre per year set on the plots, regardless of the quality of grazing, the average horse owner cannot compete with the high tenders offered and find their only option is to turn their horses out onto the vast Common areas in the summer.

Not only are the summer grazing Common areas littered with wire and debris which puts animals at risk and boosts government coffers even further with veterinary bills, it makes horses less accessible for riding through the week.

The majority of owners contacted by Penguin News thought the summer grazing rate was reasonable, but questioned why there was one at all when other sports can enjoy their outdoor and less traditional activities, without having to pay through the nose for it.

"Horse riding is a dying tradition and should be encouraged and made easier for children to

access, not made harder by FIG for people to keep horses in and around Stanley," said Natasha Elbakidze.

The Golf Club signed a rent free lease on the old "60 Acre" paddock in December.

This was a policy decision on government's part, recognising the extensive development of the area and also because it strengthened the idea of healthy outdoor pursuits.

This is in complete contradiction to the way horse owners' access to Common land is treated.

Many horse owners share their skills and horses in a bid to encourage young people to maintain an important part of the Islands' heritage and provide community entertainment in the form of the three-day Christmas race meeting and Camp sports events.

Ron Binnie who has raced for 48 years said these events were "very important," but added that it seemed "everyone was being treated differently."

The power of the Lands Committee should be questioned, said Mr Binnie. "They seem to take parts of the Common at will. I thought it was for the people of Stanley."

Flight delays

COMPETITORS in the Nat West Island Games have been delayed in getting out of the Islands as a result of the volcanic ash cloud emanating from an eruption in Chile. The football team and other competitors experienced a delay in Punta Arenas on Tuesday, arriving in Santiago the following day before onward travel to Madrid. Travellers making their way south have also experienced delays for up to two weeks with airbridge passengers spending four nights on Ascension Island before continuing their journey to the Falklands, arriving at Mount Pleasant on Monday afternoon. Delays are also affecting Australia with delays of up to eight days currently predicted.

Human rights

ANOTHER round of human rights training organised by the Commonwealth Human Rights Institute will begin on July 19. This is part of a Foreign and Commonwealth sponsored project across all Overseas Territories and follows on from a previous round which took place in March 2010. Organiser Ms Alison Inglis confirmed that as well as raising awareness of human rights in the community, last year's training also led to the publication by the Courts of a leaflet about the Falkland Islands legal aid scheme and a grant for the compilation of a library of books and leaflets on the subject.

FIC donations

THE green token scheme at the West Store is going from strength to strength with a total of £2,500 donated to local charities so far this year. The Acorns, Sea Cadets and Stephen Jaffray Memorial Fund are the next recipients of cheques and will soon receive £100.03, £109.76 and £290.21 respectively. See back page for a breakdown of other donations this year.

More ash

CHILEAN experts warned on Thursday that a cork of lava could lead to another explosion at the Puyehue volcano possibly leading to further flight delays. While the ash fall in the Falklands has been light compared to that in 1991, southern Patagonian ranchers are becoming seriously concerned about live-stock now forced to graze on ash-covered pasture.

Airstrip work

THE Public Works Department currently have a team on West Point undertaking a survey and ground investigation works so a cost effective plan for lengthening the airstrip can be compiled. No further works have been agreed or planned at this time, said Engineer Simon Catton.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

MY attempts at précis got me into trouble last week when someone, not quite following my drift, thought I said that the work of the import substitution working group should be confidential. I'm sorry about that entirely false impression. Keeping to 350 words is testing at times for someone who normally writes in long convoluted sentences. I have also been reprimanded by someone else for assuming too much of the reader, that I will not change.

THE news of the recent 'defection' was sad. Clearly, airing personal problems to the international press to be used by the Argentine propaganda machine is not well judged and caused distress and anger here, especially because of the timing. The sense of betrayal is greater because of the number of people who supported this unfortunate individual for many years, not least FIG which funded him for no less than three education courses, apparently none was completed satisfactorily. Let us hope there are as many psychiatrists in Buenos Aires as there are plastic surgeons.

OUR representatives are at the UN Committee of 24 again this week and will visit Washington. There is also a flying visit to Canada planned to renew the links made some years ago by a previous council that the last unfortunately allowed to lapse. The Committee of 24 seems increasingly irrelevant, but if we were not represented there by elected members then the so-called islanders trotted out year after year to speak on behalf of the Argentines would have the floor. Gibraltar take a different view and I believe are working to be delisted; we should watch that carefully.

BY Friday we will know who the new MLA is, and I will of course be happy to work with whoever the electorate choose for the benefit of our country. I share the disappointment of many of the electorate that there were no completely new candidates to consider. I know it is a difficult job and the material rewards are not great, but just shouting from the sidelines will never be as effective as trying to make a difference from the inside.

Gav: monster will take some beating

ASSEMBLY Member Gavin Short has spoken out against the unnecessary paperwork and levels of bureaucracy which, in some cases, is detracting from the everyday work in some government departments.

"It's a monster that is going to take some beating," he told Penguin News.

Cllr Short said he has a suspicion the Islands are importing a lot of the lunacy which has almost brought other parts of the world to a standstill by being more dedicated to measuring and producing statistics than actually doing anything productive.

But, he said, even with the support he would need to "attack the beast" it was something that was unlikely to be finished in his time as an Assembly Member.

"I guess the best way to start would be for FIG to stop importing any more of the world's lunacy (as far as they could) and start work on cutting back on what we already have. The Falklands, whilst being a country in its own right, is the size of a little village and we really have to try and tailor things to our own level," he said.

"There will always be inter-

national commitments that mean we are going to have comply with some of the silliness the world will force upon us, but this mania we have with measurements is taking up more and more of people's time and the people themselves say they would much rather be doing what they signed up for."

At a recent Police Committee meeting Cllr Short referred to the Safety Management System (SMS - a term used to refer to a comprehensive business management system designed to manage occupational safety and health elements in the workplace) as being one such lunacy which is eating up valuable man hours in the work place.

Enlarging on the subject Cllr Short told Penguin News he be-

lieves the Government Air Service was using SMS due to CAA commitments, but any attempt to roll it out through FIG would probably bring things to a shuddering halt.

A staunch General Employees Union supporter and former chairman, Cllr Short said he had always championed health and safety, but what he envisioned was a practical system which protected workers from being forced into doing something dangerous or by sheer ignorance getting into a situation that could be dangerous.

"But what I do not want is what the UK has got themselves into. Basically, unless you have done a ladder safety course - plus probably a course on electricity - you can't change a light bulb," he said.

SMS could be implemented in FIG with a few more bodies and a lot of expense but it would also have a knock-on effect on the private sector, he said.

Cllr Short said it was something MLAs would have to have a good think about, "when the dust has settled a little from a few other quite important things that we have people going flat out on."

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE: VACANCY

An opportunity has arisen for a member of the community to become involved in helping to ensure that FIG is delivering value-for-money to the residents of the Falkland Islands. Expressions of interest are sought from members of the public wishing to become a member of the Public Accounts Committee (PAC).

Under the Falkland Islands Constitution, the PAC comprises:

(a) a chairman and two other members appointed by the Governor; and

(b) two members of the Legislative Assembly.

The PAC currently has a vacancy for an "other member" under (a) above. The role involves six (or so) meetings per year, each lasting two hours, with an estimated time commitment of four hours per month for background reading and preparation. The role is unpaid but expenses are reimbursed. The appointment period will be until 31 January 2012 (in order to tie in with the appointment periods of the other, existing members).

The PAC has an important scrutiny role over the public accounts of all government departments and specified bodies. The PAC's task is to ensure that public funds have been expended properly, for the purposes for which they were voted by the Legislative Assembly. Hence the role is varied, complex and fascinating. Individuals appointed to the PAC make a significant contribution to the community, in helping to maintain high standards of public administration and good governance in the Falkland Islands. This calls for PAC members themselves to have the highest standards of personal integrity, discretion and commitment to the good governance of the Islands.

Applications should be submitted to the Governor by 30 July, setting out the reasons for the applicant's interest in appointment to the PAC and the skills and experience that the applicant would bring to the job.

Drink driving

PATRICK Andrew Minto appeared in court on June 17 on a charge that on May 27 while unfit through drink or drugs he drove a DAF tipper truck on the Stanley to Darwin Road.

Mr Minto had made an earlier application for his case to be adjourned saying he had been unable to obtain legal advice as one lawyer was out of the Falkland Islands on holiday while another was about to leave on holiday.

The Senior Magistrate said he had made enquiries and Mr Lang was due to return to the Islands on June 27. He adjourned the case until Mr Minto had had time to consult with Mr Lang, and set a new court date for July 6.

Ag additions

AGRICULTURAL advisers Helen Thoday and Warren Landles are shortly to be hired by the Department of Agriculture according to a UK trade paper. It is understood formalities have yet to be finalised in relation to the appointments but the couple is expected to arrive prior to Farmers Week. It is intended they will succeed posts most recently filled by advisers Tony Mills and Ian Campbell.

Liverpudlian supporter

THE Liverpool Echo printed a reader's letter this week vehemently defending the Falkland Islanders' right to self determination.

Mr Mark Bill of Liverpool said, "It should be noted that southern Argentina didn't become even a disputed part of Argentina, acquired substantially through the extermination of a number of indigenous Indians, until the middle of the 19th Century — when the Falkland Islands had long been held by the UK."

He also suggested the USA remember their supposed belief in democracy.

MBE for Antrim vet

FALKLANDS naval veteran Glen Young (47) is to receive an MBE for his contribution to the development of the Royal Navy's physical fitness agenda. Scarborough man Glen was only 18 years old when he served on HMS Antrim which was hit by an Argentine bomb in 1982.

Sawle: historical accounts do not support Argentine theory

IN a good cop bad cop approach to the United Nations Decolonisation Committee this week, a Falkland Islands Government representative assertively exploded Argentine myths about the history of the sovereignty of the Islands while another invited the committee's Chair to visit.

Member of Legislative Assembly (MLA) Dick Sawle attending the Special Committee of 24 on Decolonisation, along with MLA Roger Edwards, informed the committee, "Argentine Foreign Minister Timerman will claim later this morning that an Argentine civilian population was expelled from the Falklands in 1833."

"In 1833, Britain did expel an Argentine military garrison that had been sent to the Islands three months earlier, but the small civilian population present on the islands in 1833 was encouraged to remain and all but four individuals decided to do so — not forty, four hundred or four thousand,

Concordia docking test first step to East Cove commercialisation

EAST West ferry Concordia Bay carried out a successful test docking this month proving the viability of operating the vessel in East Cove Military Port (ECMP).

The operation was part of the Falkland Islands Government's options for localisation that included the wider use of East Cove said an MoD spokesperson.

Manager of Concordia Bay's operator Workboat Services Ltd (WBS) Adam Cockwell said, "We were happy to carry out a test run into ECMP with the Concordia Bay at the request of MoD and the Falkland Islands Government. As expected, no real issues were encountered with this operation."

He added, "It is not anticipated that this will change operations for the Concordia Bay in the near future and Stanley will

remain the main port for bunkering and collecting of cargo, but it is hoped that ECMP may be used on occasion when logistically advantageous."

An MoD spokesperson said the ferry berthed and lowered its ramp onto the jetty, "providing positive confirmation of the potential for its operation at the port."

"It is hoped this will be the first step to opening up ECMP for further commercialisation."

Workboat Services

Speaking generally about the ferry, Mr Cockwell said "From our point of view the season seems to have been very successful and we are looking forward to getting plenty of feedback from our customers in the upcoming Farmers Week."

The WBS session takes place on July 8 at 1pm.

Q HOW many houses in the private sector are vacant and what evidence does government have that private sector rents are kept artificially low due to government's competitiveness?

Director of Public Works, Manfred Keenleyside provided answers to this and the following two questions...

A IT is not known how many private sector houses are currently vacant. There is awareness that some units appear to be vacant for prolonged periods but the number is not known nor has been tracked.

The reasons why a house may be left empty will vary and although some may be actual or potential lets, others are likely to be second homes with intermittent use, or indeed be second or multiple properties owned by an individual or organisation which are left vacant permanently or almost so, with no intention of their being let.

The suggestion that FIG is keeping private sector rentals artificially low is the questioner's, and perhaps one for the questioner to justify. Some private properties have been advertised for rental over several weeks and longer in the PN which suggests that the private sector market is still competitive.

That FIG rentals appear to be broadly lower than those in the

private sector is likely to have some impact on market rents in relation to those individuals who could qualify for FIG housing but even those who could qualify may wish to rent from the private sector, or indeed own rather than rent.

There are a number of individuals currently renting from FIG who have successfully bid for FIG housing plots to enable them to build their own house and some are already in the process.

Q WHAT was the total cost of purchase, transport to docks, freight, transport to warehouse then to erection sites, erecting material, ie. concrete etc, vehicle use, fuel & manpower, of the warning posts along the bypass road.

A THE landed Stanley cost for the posts was £2,260.50.

This was not cost tracked as a separate project, so the level of detail requested is not available in terms of total cost for the posts including installation but our estimated further costs for the posts from landing to completion of installation is approximately £2,665 including internal plant

Q CONSIDERING the new developments at Mink Park, are there any plans to:

- 1) Provide a pavement and lighting on Moody Brook Road to allow residents to walk safely along the road both day and night into Stanley?; and
- 2) To reduce the speed limit on Moody Brook Road to less than 40mph?

A THE Moody Brook road is work in progress. The intention was and is that it will be surfaced as far as the Mink Park site which should address the matter of loose stones being thrown up.

The timing for surfacing has been moved back due to other priorities but is now to be undertaken in the October-December 2011 period which should still be in advance of most properties in the site being completed and occupied.

It was not proposed, or made a planning requirement when the Mink Park development was approved that there would be a footway or street lighting along the Moody Brook Road.

The need or otherwise to reduce the speed limit was discussed at

the time the development was planned, and the decision taken at that point was that that it was not seen as necessary but could be kept under review.

It is intended that reflective marker posts of the type used on Bypass/Airport Road will be installed once the surfacing is complete, which will effect visible separation between pedestrians and motorists and enable pedestrians to safely use the hard shoulder.

Q COULD the FIC please explain how their mark up price is nearly triple the UK price item on some products in the west store.

FALKLAND Islanders will not have been surprised by the spectacular revelation that one of their number has decided to become an Argentine citizen and live in that country. He is not the first to make the move, either for political reasons (two "defected" in the immediate aftermath of the 1982 war) or for family reasons (a handful of local women have married Argentines and settled there).

It is hardly a mass movement of people and a seismic shift in the Islanders' stance. And, if asked to name the next person to make such a move, most would have named artist James Peck. James has always been a peaceful, bohemian type, finding it difficult to settle down and always harbouring a tendency to question the received wisdom, dogma and hackneyed rhetoric that has pinned the positions of all sides in the Falklands dispute. He was no flag waver, and seemed to have no strong political loyalty, except to the idea that further conflict was to be avoided at all costs and that Islanders should be free to live quietly in their own little corner of the world. James seemed to think we can all be pleasant to each other. That attitude led him to a cosmopolitan life that involved marrying an Argentine girl and spending some time in Buenos Aires, studying art and teaching (at the Falklands Government expense) in Britain; and exhibiting his work in all three corners of the world.

What will have come as a

shock to Islanders – and perhaps even to some of his broad-minded Argentine friends – is that James presented himself to President Christina Kirchner on a plate, to be squeezed like a lemon for as much propaganda benefit as possible. Hence the unseemly spectacle of the President personally handing him his new Argentine ID card in front of a hundred cameras on June 14. And that date, Liberation Day, recalling the Argentine surrender, was no coincidence. It is marked in London with a large scale party and supposedly inspiring speech for supporters, and in Port Stanley with a parade and more parties. But it was only the event in Argentina that gained press coverage – and a lot of it.

This June 14 was a victory for Buenos Aires.

It is entirely possible that James Peck came under heavy pressure to appear publicly with the President. One can imagine it would be difficult to say no to such an invitation if it is an implied condition of gaining the desired ID card. But in so doing, and not uttering any words to excuse himself, he gave her the chance to present a disingenuous message about Argentina's peaceful intentions. Her agenda does not include military action, it is true, but it does include applying every tool in her kit to cut the Islands off, make the lives of Islanders uncomfortable and force Britain to talk. No Falklands ships can now travel to mainland ports, thanks to her aggressive diplomacy. His compatriots (or former compatriots?) will not thank James for apparently endorsing this very unfriendly president, and helping her campaign to secure another term.

But everyone makes mistakes, and few cannot be rectified. This now rather influential Islander could yet do some good by disassociating himself from the scheming politicians and opposing the inherent wickedness of territorial nationalism – whoever espouses it. He could show through his art and his words that coexistence and cooperation, not political flag waving and squabbling over land, is the way to a peaceful future. Your call James.

Knight in gold braid

A MEMORIAL service for the man credited with persuading Margaret Thatcher that a task force should be sent from Britain to reclaim the Falkland Islands, took place on June 17 in the UK.

Representatives from the top echelon of the armed forces were among 800 people who attended a memorial service in Hampshire for Admiral of the Fleet Sir Henry Leach.

Sir Henry was described by Andrew Marr as Mrs Thatcher's 'knight in golden braid', his advice on the Falklands was clear: "if we pussyfoot in our actions and do not achieve complete success, in another few months we shall be living in a different country whose word counts for little."

The First Sea Lord, Admiral Sir Mark Stanhope led the tributes to Sir Henry at Winchester Cathedral, describing him as a "truly inspirational leader" and an "utterly selfless and moral man".

The First Sea Lord was there to represent the Queen and Duke of Edinburgh and five other members of the Royal Family were represented. Admiral Stanhope said: "Sir Henry was a truly inspirational leader whose wartime experience, decisiveness and coolness under pressure played a pivotal role in ensuring the recovery of the Falkland Islands from Argentine invasion in 1982."

Farmer rescue

AN RAF search and rescue helicopter successfully carried injured West farmer Riki Evans to Stanley on Sunday, June 19 despite dangerous weather conditions.

Mr Evans suffered a serious ankle injury following a fall.

An MoD spokesperson said that morning a rescue call was received by the Joint Operations Centre at Mount Pleasant and despite very poor visibility and ongoing ash cloud in the area, a helicopter was deployed and landed close to Fox Bay around 3pm. Winchman Flt Sgt Mick Lambert assisted the casualty on the ground before loading him onto a stretcher and into the waiting helicopter to be taken to the hospital in Stanley.

Despite seriously deteriorating weather conditions they eventually landed safely.

Lt Bullock RN said, "We are always pleased to support the local community in the Falkland Islands."

"This rescue was particularly challenging because of the weather, but the patient was transferred successfully and hopefully will make a full recovery."

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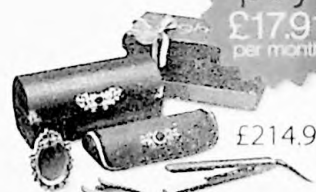

It must be stressed that calling the Royal Falkland Islands Police on any of these frequencies must only be done in the event of an emergency

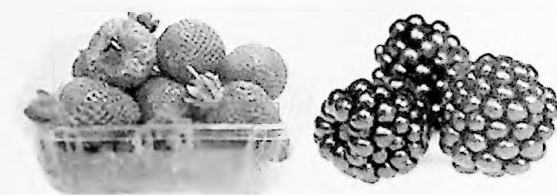

Department of Agriculture Wool Market Report June 16, 2011

By Tony Mills, Department of Agriculture, Falkland Islands

Market reports run this week with the lead title of 'Upward trend in Aussie prices unrelenting'. This very apt title is because of another rise in the FMI lifting it to a record level of 1431 AU c/kg (935 GB p/kg). With no change in supply/demand fundamentals the sentiment is the market should hold firm through the upcoming summer recess in July. Taking out the influence of exchange rate the 20 to 24 micron categories still appear to be the wool the buyers are chasing as they continue to rise. Either side of these wools, price movements are a little more volatile. Quality continues to attract the buyer's eye with off types suffering. This quest for quality has also flowed through to the skirtings and oddments I believe the last wool of the shearing season has made it to the UK so many will be expecting their test results through soon. Let's hope the buyers aren't too shy with quotes, though this appears the case on the forward prices on offer.

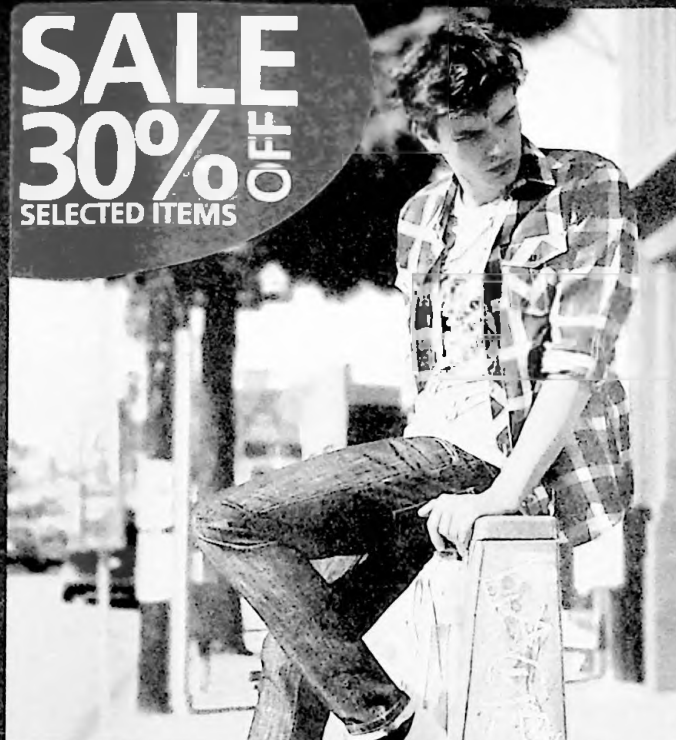

Longline fishing deathtrap: efforts must continue to minimise seabird mortality

A STUDY has revealed that at least 160,000 and potentially in excess of 320,000 seabirds are killed annually in longline fisheries globally.

Some previous studies have assessed the level of seabird bycatch in longline fisheries for particular regions and groups of seabirds, but this is the first study to provide a global estimate of bycatch of all seabirds in longline fisheries.

The most frequently caught birds were albatrosses, petrels and shearwaters, many of which are listed as threatened with extinction. The study highlights that there is evidence of substantial reductions in bycatch rates in some key fisheries. These reductions were due to a number of factors, including greater and more effective use of mitigation measures specifically designed to reduce seabird bycatch, such as bird scaring lines, also known astori lines.

This has certainly been the case in South Georgia and the Falkland Islands, where seabird bycatch levels associated with longline fisheries have been reduced to negligible levels.

In the case of South Georgia, seabird bycatch in the longline

fishery for Patagonian toothfish was reduced from several thousand birds in the mid 1990s to the current annual estimate of zero birds in a very short period of time.

Similarly, seabird bycatch in the longline fishery for Patagonian toothfish in the Falkland Islands has also been substantially reduced, with zero bycatch recorded for the last three years.

In both cases, the reduction in seabird bycatch has been achieved through the introduction of mandatory mitigation measures, the effective implementation by vessels of these measures, supported by observer programmes to monitor the efficacy of measures and bycatch rates.

Dr Paul Brickley of the Fisheries Department reported that "the fishing industry has made great efforts in addressing the issue of bycatch by implementing seabird friendly practices and good house

keeping on their longliners operating in the Falkland Islands."

The reduction of seabird bycatch in these, and other fisheries, demonstrates that the problem of seabird bycatch in longline fisheries can be reduced to negligible proportions using relatively simple, but effective, measures.

Unfortunately, the study reports that there remain many longline fisheries which have very high levels of seabird bycatch mortality and others with insufficient data to properly assess seabird bycatch. Some of these fisheries are known to impact seabirds breeding on the UK South Atlantic Overseas Territories of the Falkland Islands, South Georgia and Tristan da Cunha, which collectively support a third of the world's breed-

ing albatrosses. It is important that efforts continue in the Falkland Islands and South Georgia to minimise seabird mortality in longline fisheries, as well as in trawl fisheries, and that the assessment of seabird bycatch in other relevant fisheries is improved, and effective mitigation measures introduced and implemented to reduce levels of bycatch.

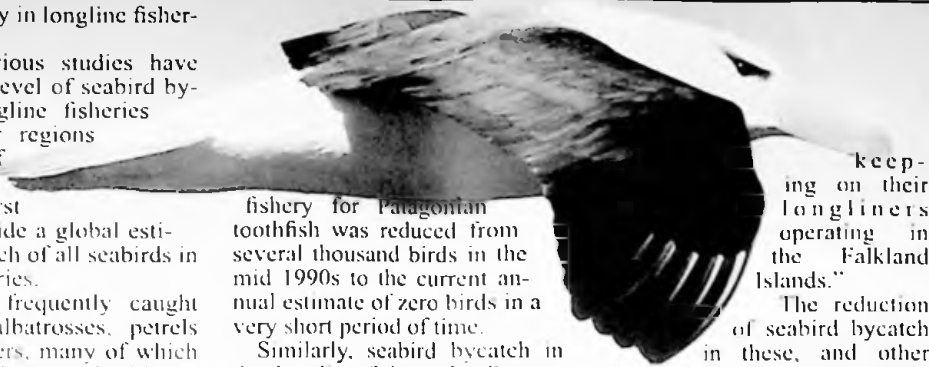
The study does not consider bycatch of seabirds in trawl and gill-net fisheries, which are now recognised as contributing significantly to the global bycatch total in certain regions.

Commenting on the report, Dr Martin Collins of South Georgia Government indicated that "the success of the South Georgia and the Falklands longline fisheries in virtually eliminating seabird bycatch, demonstrates what can be achieved with careful mitigation measures."

"There is now an urgent need for similar mitigation measures to be introduced to fisheries in other areas to halt the alarming declines in many populations of albatrosses and petrels."

The study referred to in the article was conducted by the (RSPB) and BirdLife International.

With a £94,099 Arts Council grant the Opening Ceremony promises to be an extravaganza with a carnival style theme.

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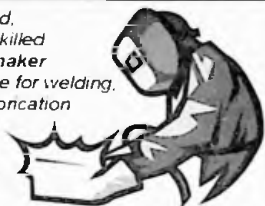
